HE MADE MY DAY!

Durham County General Hospital provides for pastors a listing each day of all patients in the hospital, arranged in denominational blocks. Recently I noted a name that made a very faint connection to some one in the past - but what connection! Where had I known the man? What was the kind of relationship? One day, when I was a bit less pressed for time than usual, I decided to risk a quick visit.

To my utter surprise, the man greeted me by name when I came in the door and did so with a warmth of expression that absolutely amazed me. I fear that I must confess that I would have passed him on the street without recognizing him - but he knew me. We had a delightful visit, a quick filling in on what had happened in the more than thirty years since we had seen each other, and a rapid assessment of his health - for after all, he was in the hospital.

As I prepared to leave, he said, "Just one minute more. You are obviously surprised I recognized you so quickly. Would you like to know why?" Since I really did want to know I decided to risk his answer, and asked him why he did remember me. He said, "Now I am going to make your day" — and then he proceeded to do so with some of the kindest words I've heard in a long time. Quite undeserved they may have been but for me, they were most timely.

The moral of the little story is not to tell you what a remarkable person I am for that would be both out of order and untruthful; the point of the story is that this man's kind remembrance of other days and situations in which we were involved came to expression and he did say what was in his heart. The consequence for me is that he not only "made my day" but he warmed my heart in a wonderful way.

All of us have in our memories and our hearts many persons to whom we owe much in many ways; if you are as I, much of this is the sort of debt that is totally unrepayable. But it is well within the power of each of us to make some kind of overt expression by which those persons will know how blessed we have been because of them. It might even be that in a moment of great honesty, we would thank God for His mercies to us, not in the perfunctory words that come easily (and with little meaning) to our lips, but with the expression of a devout and thankful heart, "expressions too deep for utterance" that come almost in groaning of the spirit.

This sort of thing might make some one else's day as well as bless us. We shall not make God's day for Him for that is not in our power; but honest acknowledgement to Him will make our day - any day and every day! Try it! A surprise may await you.
