BICENTENNIAL MINUTES THE SUNDAY SCHOOL 1780-1980

MINUTE 2

Sunday Schools multiplied rapidly in America, first to spread literacy — but very soon they were devoted to religious instruction. In 1791, just eleven years after Robert Raikes had started a movement in Gloucester, England, there were Sunday Schools, offering to teach reading and writing, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; Providence, Rhode Island; and Passaic Falls, New Jersey. Except for the fact that these schools met on Sunday for children who could not attend weekday schools, the Sunday Schools taught essentially secular subjects, and the teachers were paid. The first Sunday School organized exclusively for Christian education began in the Second Baptist Church of Baltimore in 1804. Later, in September, 1815, a Presbyterian Sunday School was opened in Philadelphia, and the very next week three women in the First Baptist Church organized a second Sunday School in that city. After that, Sunday Schools carried Christian instruction wherever Americans lived. Missionaries who followed the march of the frontier westward founded Sunday Schools first, and as these grew along with their new communities, their members organized churches. That was the way it was in America; education and evangelism were inseparably united!
