WHAT IS MY PART?

As Loyalty Day comes near, all of us are, I hope, thinking and praying about our giving as we plan for 1981. Next week's <u>Messenger</u> will bring you a complete line by line copy of the proposed budget the Administrative Board presents to the congregation. The proposed budget will become a reality by our response. It comes to us in terms of challenge in view of needs presented. It will merit our careful scrutiny.

There are several ways to consider how much we will plan to give. One, of course, is how much God has granted us which we can use in giving in turn to His work. Another way is in the consideration of what others do as a basis for what we ourselves can do. Look at these figures representative of our pledges for 1980:

The 25 largest givers gave \$58,000, 29% of our budget.

The largest 43 givers gave 84,321, 38.5% of our budget.

The 64 largest givers gave 100,790, 51% of our budget.

Don't despair! The rest of us provided the rest of it. What is important to remember is that each gift was necessary to insure the total - and you responded well. The second important point to remember is that all of us gave as God enabled us. In view of all this, the question to raise that concerns us individually, without respect to others is: Is it possible for me to increase my giving?

Has the Lord provided more for us? Nearly every one has in one way or another received some increase in income in 1980 over 1979. Have we taken to heart the counsel to simpler living so that, among other things, we can give more? It is not correct to say that every one of us can do more. Neither is it correct to say that none of us can give more. Your reading of letters from the Every Member Commitment Committee will give some idea of the fact that a very modest increase in program activity and equally modest salary increases for the church staff combine to make a need for considerable increases in giving before us.

I happen to believe that what will be asked when the Administrative Board aproves a proposed budget for your consideration is well within our possibility. It will come to reality when, one by one, prayerfully and thoughtfully, we consider what God has already prepared us to do. Be praying and thinking — and as more specific data come to you, you will know how to proceed. Blessings on every one of us as we come together, His people, united in His tasks!
