Can You See? Can't You See?

How often in anxiety or perplexity we say to some one, "Can't you see?". Sometimes we put it in a more hopeful vein, "Can you see?". What we talk about is something that is obvious to us and appears completely out of their field of vision. None of us is exempt from one or the other sides of this question as it applies to some particular situations. One of my own blindnesses lies in not being able to perceive in some kinds of abstract paintings some of what seems immediately evident to others. Conversely, I can wax eloquent and get thrilled over the grain pattern in a piece of wood that to others appears best as a candidate for the fireplace!

It is possible that in the area of our religious convictions we meet about as much of this "Can you see? Can't you see?" as in any other aspect of our life. Jesus seems to have had the same kind of problem with those who knew Him and who witnessed some of the great acts that He did. Any one with normal vision could see what had happened; but how few could comprehend the meaning of what they saw!

The Gospel lessons for Sunday describe a healing and also an event which bystanders took to be a resurrection from the dead. St. Matthew recorded these events not simply to tell something of what happened long ago but also to speak to us something of how we may perceive what is happening around us today. It is never helpful for one to say to another in a tone of exasperation, "Can't you see?". It usually is helpful if in a spirit of loving, humble service and witness, we seek to share with others our own experience and vision of who and what Jesus Christ is, what He does, what He means to us.

"Making the Connection" is part of the answer to "Can you see?", "Can't you see?". The first connection has to be between God and the one who would ask the question. What a Christian has to share is not the product of his own wisdom and powers; it is the result of the grace of God at work in his life. So acknowledged, the questions that arise can be answered in a way helpful to us all.

Read St. Matthew 9:18-26 and think about "making the connection" and how it touches your own life. Come Sunday, 16 November and let us share our reflections!
