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INAUGURATION DAY

On 20 January, Ronald Reagan will be sworn in as president of the United States. The ceremonies that make up the day's agenda will hold the attention of all citizens of every political persuasion. Most of us will find something that we would do differently were it our party; all of us will agree that in a variety of ways, notice is being given to the whole country that a new administration is in place and setting to work.

The peaceful transition of administration to administration is a marvel to behold. Generally the outgoing president and his officers do what is possible to smooth the way for their successors. It is surely a bitter day for those leaving office who feel that they and their policies have been decisively rejected by the voters. It is equally sure that the incoming group feels exactly on the spot to begin to produce something akin to realization of the promises made in the heat and haste of campaigns.

For the whole nation, it is a time of wonderment - and it ought to be a time of soulsearching as well. We ask a great deal of those whom we elect as our leaders; do we give to them support in the same degree of our expectations of them? The oath of office is administered with one hand on the Bible; what is our willingness to uphold these officials through our prayers? Will we be as willing to volunteer our help in every way possible as we are quick to criticize that which displeases us?

Much talk is heard about a re-affirmation of traditional moral values. Such affirmion if it is made at all can't be done for us by some one else, not even a president. is our responsibility so to order our lives that the affirmation takes place. It may be repeated until one is weary of it, but President Kennedy's "Ask not what your country can do for you but rather, ask what you can do for your country" is still directly to the point.

Not because President-elect Reagan is a better or worse Christian or citizen than Mr. Carter (or any one of us) but because of the tremendous responsibility of his office, all of us need to make daily intercession for him and for officers of government at every level. With some justice it can be said that on the one hand we elect persons to office and on the other, we begin immediately sniping at them. I do not propose that we be supportive when we have honest cause for disagreement but I suggest that rather than immediately blame everything on Washington, we begin by self-examination. That way, 20 January would be a national day for all of us, a day of beginning again. I believe it is time for all of us to take this kind of step! Bless you each one.
