HOW CAN THESE THINGS BE?

Some of us will recognize the title of this little essay as the words of Nicodemus to Jesus. Jesus had answered Nicodemus' questions with the assertion that to see the Kingdom of God, a person must be born again. Nicodemus was a good and able man - and he was stunned by such an answer. Quite naturally and realistically he responded, "Teacher, how can these things be?'

As we approach Easter and think of the Resurrection of Jesus, the same kind of response comes to our minds. It is a response that comes out of our "natural" mind. It is the witness of the world around us that men are born, live and then die. It comes from the certainty of our own demise and non-return to the life of this world.

The primacy of Easter among all Christian festivals is precisely because it cuts across all our pre-conceptions and dramatically challenges the kind of life expectations we have. Many people like to shock others and to attack what are sometimes called the "sacred cows" to which no challenge should ever be given. Some like to do this sort of thing to stimulate thinking; others like to do it simply to bowl people over. The difference in these kinds of attitudes and the fact of Easter is that the shock of Easter comes, in a real sense, after the fact. It is because Jesus was raised from the dead that our pre-conceptions are shaken and our life expectations are upset.

Splendid as was the birth of Jesus and remarkable as were the circumstances surrounding His birth, all of us come into the world through physical birth. We rejoice that we can identify with the Holy Infant in sharing an experience. But in His resurrection, as St. Paul put it, "He is the first fruits of them that slept". This experience lies in the future for us. It is the light in an otherwise clouded and somber future. It is the fact that enlightens the difficulties of this life. It is God's fact entering into a world that really doesn't want to be disturbed by challenges. In a sense, not only do we say, "How can these things be?"; God also says it to us!

The finding out of "how these things can be" is the work of faith. Easter calls us to faith affirmation and to renewed confidence that the issues of time, history, of this and of all worlds, are still in God's hands. That's how these things can be - and that is what Easter is all about. Let's celebrate it together in God's house.
