I commend to you our county centennial as well as our church's anniversary. We will all be blessed and edified by learning or refreshing our acquaintance of "how these things have come to be." I rejoice that we live in an era old enough to appreciate its roots and young enough to be vigorous and growing. Let's keep it that way. The best of life is yet to be - enjoy it a day at a time and profit from each day.
