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VACATIONS --- USES AND ABUSES!

Long ago a wise man observed that more people know how to make money than know how to use money wisely. As we get into the vacation season each year, I suspect the same theory applies to vacations - that more of us have vacations than know how to use them wisely. In no way do I consider that I am one of the wise ones as to the use of vacations for, during the greater part of my life, I shunned vacations as something undesireable if not downright wrong. That rather unsocial view has disappeared - but for many of us, the question remains: What in fact do we do with this unusual interval in our lives?

Some of us try to put into each vacation day two or three times the activity of a "normal" day in our lives. Others get into the "concrete derby" and try to see how many hundreds of miles of turnpike or interstate fatigue can be registered on the odometer, as if the value of the period depends on the mileage of scenery that passes our windows. For some, being indoors for nearly all the year, the temptation to which we succumb is to try in a few short days to pack enough outdoor living, including skin tanning, to make up for the remainder of the indoor year. For a few, this vacation time is that period of life when we seek to do everything around homes and property for which time seems not available during the remainder of the year. And then others you complete the list as you will.

A vacation is, in terms of the meaning of the word, "an interval of time devoted to rest or relaxation from work, study, etc.". It may be that the "et cetera" is where the trouble gets into the picture. A trend that alarms me is the promotion of a vacation from one's husband or wife so that this supposedly creative time of life is spent away from one's spouse. If that is an appealing thing, one will be wise to evaluate the whole matter of marriage and seek help in bringing some enrichment and meaning to life's closest, dearest relationship.

What about a vacation as a time for change from our accustomed routine? It need not involve long, costly travel, though it may. If one stays busy nearly all the time, stay busy with the challenge of different concerns at this point. Seek deliberately to change both the pace and the circumstances of life. If home making is a chief activity in your life, some time away from the usual routine and responsibility is to be desired.

Try a vacation with little or no TV! You might find that time for reading, thinking, even conversation, is more worthwhile than one often thinks. What about a vacation with the objective of time to think about your life of the spirit, where you are headed, what really are your values deeply held and consistently sought? You might even think about your relationship to Jesus Christ, with time enough to come to some conclusions and to make some decisions. Would you believe that many of us are usually too busy to find time for this, the most important business of life and eternity? Is that not simply too busy? Sweet are the uses of vacations for those wise enough to find them!
