#### MORE ABOUT THAT WEDDING!

As one reads of and thinks about the recent royal wedding and our viewing it on television, I am amazed by the logistics of the whole matter. This seemed to me summed up in one tiny action — as the Prince and Princess of Wales neared the exit from St. Paul's Cathedral, from off camera magically, at the precisely exact instant, his naval commander's cap and white gloves were handed him. There was just time to get them on as they approached the great portal from the church. All the way through the event, the right things happened at the exact moment in a manner that made it seem it could have been no other way. As a matter of fact, the more details there are, the more the probability of some one over—responding, or responding too early — or too late. So far as my very limited observation of it went, there simply were no slips.

Now, that takes a lot of planning, preparation and cooperation. Some large wedding parties in almost any church require the same meticulous planning and preparation. To that end, our wedding consultant/director (usually Kay Hammond), the bride and her mother consult well in advance down to the last fine detail. When every one cooperates and the rehearsal achieves that for which it is designed, then it seems that everything happens perfectly, could not have been any other way and the occasion is beautiful, sacred and memorable.

What many of us do not realize is that the same care and attention to detail goes into any service of worship in any church where people care about both the substance and the manner in which they praise Almighty God and worship Him. If you have never considered what is required of a rather large number of persons for a morning service at Duke Memorial, give it some thought now! And if you have thought about it, review the whole matter in your mind. Start with the availability of parking; in your thoughts, approach the church, enter, receive greetings, assistance, the Order of Service, find your seat. The functions of the choir, organist, and the pastors do not happen automatically or by chance. The co-ordination of the whole sequence ought to appear natural and effortless; the fact is rather otherwise.

The point of all this is the suggestion that we recognize by proper words of appreciation all the lay members of Duke Memorial who in many more ways than most of us realize make possible what happens here, not just in worship services but in everything that is done. Our collective debt of gratitude is enormous. Next Sunday, pay off a little of it with words of appreciation to those you see "doing their thing" for God, this church and for all of us!
