REACH OUT AND TOUCH! - OR, RESPOND WHEN SOME ONE ELSE DOES

CONTACT Durham is a Christian service to our community. It offers every minute in the year a trained listener to any one who calls. Often a person deeply troubled will find it easier to talk with a total stranger than with some one well known. Listening is not an art that is passive; it is demanding, not only of patience, but also of perception; most of us respond more easily with advice or "counsel" than we do with willingness to listen and help the person find his way.

Duke Memorial participates in both monetary support (only staff members of CONTACT are paid and they are paid very poorly!) and also through volunteers. I suspect that we also participate through providing now and then some of those who call with problems or who simply need to talk for a little time with someone, any one, just so that person will listen.

The kind of participation that moves me to bring this to your attention is that a training class for volunteer workers begins Tuesday, 8 September 1981 at Asbury United Methodist Church, Markham Avenue and Clarendon Streets. Information and registration may be worked out through CONTACT'S 24 hour line, 683-1595. The training class goes on for about sixteen weeks. Enrollment does not commit you to becoming a volunteer; only you do that. However, it is fair to say that very few who take this class and get into the work of CONTACT willingly relinquish what rapidly becomes a very wonderful avenue of Christian service.

The hours which one gives in this kind of work are set by the person involved. It is alwyas important to have a large enough pool of available people so that staffing the telephone is not a problem. Hours can be worked out to fit whatever schedule you have. After all, twenty-four hours daily does offer lots of opportunities for unusual scheduling!

If your response is, "I really would like to do this but I don't know how", you are just the person to enroll in the training class. CONTACT intents to offer ample avenues of Christian witness and service but as with every thing to which God calls us, a call to serve is also a call to preparation. The training class sessions make up just exactly this kind of preparation which will not make you an "instant expert" but will enable you to function usefully and helpfully. Like swimming in cool water, some courage is required for the initial plunge. Once done, you relish each moment of it. This is your invitation to dive into the blessed and helpful work of CONTACT!


