MENTAL ILLNESS: MYTHS DISPELLED

MYTH: *Mental illnesses do not affect the average person.*

FACT: No one is immune to mental illness. The National Institute of Mental Health statistics show that 5 million adults and 7.5 million children in America have some form of mental illness in any given year.

MYTH: *A person can recover from a mental illness by turning his or her thoughts positively and with prayer.*

FACT: Mental illness is a physical, not a moral, condition. Recovery comes through receiving the necessary medical treatment and supportive services. Highly effective treatments allow many people to resume productive, satisfying lives.

MYTH: *The cause of mental illness is either poor parenting or poor character.*

FACT: Mental illnesses are no-fault brain diseases, and can strike in any family.

MYTH: *A person experiencing mental illness is possessed by an evil spirit.*

FACT: Mental illnesses are caused by physical disorders or chemical imbalances, not supernatural forces.

MYTH: *Mental illness is the same as mental retardation.*

FACT: Mental retardation is an intellectual defect at birth, or a result of illness or injury during infancy or childhood. Mental illness are brain diseases, physical disorders that often strike between the ages of 16 and 25.

MYTH: *People who have a mental illness are dangerous.*

FACT: Most people who have a mental illness are no more violent than someone suffering from cancer, diabetes or any other serious illness. More often, they are the victims of violence.

FACT: Mental illnesses are caused by physical disorders or chemical imbalances, not supernatural forces.

MYTH: Mental illness is the same as mental retardation.
FACT: Mental retardation is an intellectual defect at birth, or a result of brain damage during infancy or childhood. Mental illness is a brain disease, physical disorder, not other factors, that occurs at any age of life.

MYTH: People who have a mental illness are dangerous.
FACT: Most people who have a mental illness are no more violent than someone suffering from cancer, diabetes or any other chronic illness. More often they are the victims of violence.

UNIT 1: THE HISTORY OF THE UNITED STATES

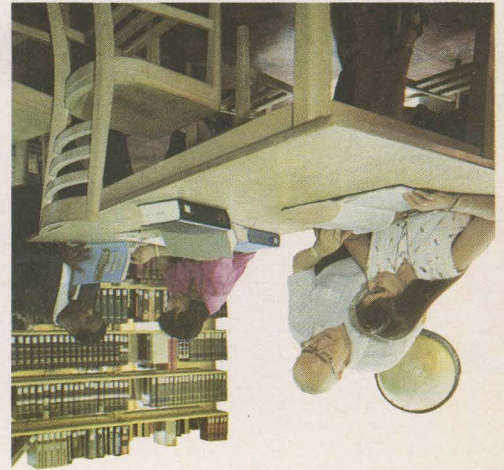

World Communion Sunday

When she finished college in 1988, Katia Paredes, now 28, got a taste of missionary service by volunteering for three years as a United Methodist mission intern. First she taught children and videotaped activities in a church and day care center near Recife, Brazil. Later, she worked with Spanish-speaking recipients of social services in San Diego, Calif.

Those experiences changed her life, and now she is eager to return to mission work after she earns her masters degrees in divinity and religious communications at United Theological Seminary, Dayton, Ohio. A Crusade Scholarship, funded by the **World Communion Sunday** offering, supports her studies.

"I feel a strong call to ministry in Latin America," said Katia, a native of Chile. Her family left there in exile in 1973 after a military coup, and later came to the United States. Her father is now a pastor in the Rio Grande Annual Conference.

"The community I served in Brazil lacked food, water, electricity and health care," she explained. "But I felt so much love among the people, so much hope and solidarity. *They taught me to be strong in my faith.*"

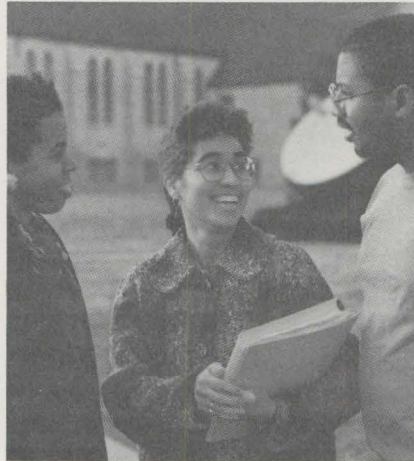
Katia wants to help churches in Brazil and elsewhere develop educational and media resources to teach others about faith and about the needs and ministries in their communities.

She is like hundreds of Crusade Scholars around the world who commit themselves to serve others through the ministry, law, medicine, education and other careers. For 50 years, Crusade Scholarships have supported post-graduate education for developing leaders in United Methodist and Methodist-affiliated churches around the world.

The scholars, along with recipients of **Ethnic Minority Scholarships** and **Ethnic Minority In-Service Training** grants, gratefully depend on the **World Communion Sunday** offering to help them pay the scaling costs of higher education. And as more applicants are turned away each year because of limited funds, it is the church that loses.

As we gather at the Lord's table to celebrate our global faith, let us remember to support students who are preparing to proclaim that faith to the world.

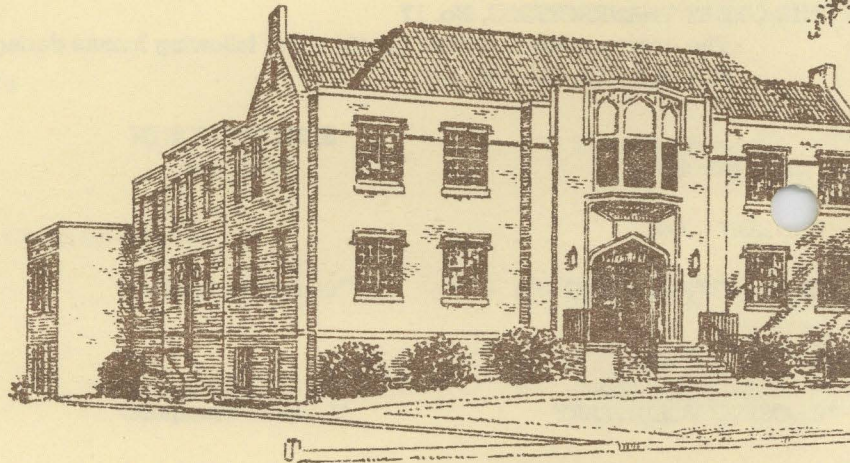
