REPORT OF THE DUKE FUND COMMISSION FOR THE YEAR 1923-24

In submitting another annual report, the Duke Fund Commission would call special attention to three important matters.

A. Conditional pledges to church buildings automatically expire unless the conditions are met within one year after the grant is made; provided, however, that the grant may be extended if a new application is filed with the Commission.

B. Believing that the next few years will see the consolidation of weak and badly located churches, the building of new church houses, and the enlarging of old ones that are inadequate for pres-

ent day-needs, therefore the Commission has voted

1. That the Commission join with the two Conferences in making a study of the needs and in securing the necessary architectural plans for the work ahead of us, and invite any Presiding Elder or Preacher in Charge interested to advise with and secure aid of the Commission in efforts to advance the work of the church in the open country.

That afternoon conferences be provided at the Pastor's School at Trinity College in June to consider the demands of needy fields and find what ought to be done.

3. That the following committee be appointed to act with the Executive Committee of this Commission in the work contemplated in this resolution; Rev. J. M. Ormond, Rev. B. E. Stanfield, Rev. J. C. Williams, and L. L. Gobble.

C. All churches that ask aid from the Duke Fund will be expected to submit plans to the Commission so as to give assurance that the church buildings helped will be sufficient to meet the needs of the communities they are intended to serve.

We feel sure that much good is being done through the money which Mr. James B. Duke is giving year by year for the upbuilding of country churches in North Carolina. It is the earnest desire of Mr. Duke and of all who have any part in the administering of this Fund that the money given for Missions and Church Extension be spent to the best possible advantage. To secure this end the Pastors and Presiding Elders must give all diligence.

The Commission would remind the North Carolina Conference that the term of Rev. Walter Patten, nominated by the Board of Missions, expires with 1924.

Resolution:

 $T.\ \Lambda.$ Sikes presented and read the following resolution, and it was adopted:

Resolved by the North Carolina Conference at its annual meeting, Wilmington, N. C., November 12, 1924, that:

- 1. We unqualifiedly condemn the so-called boxing contests which are permitted in certain cities of North Carolina as exhibition of brutality that should not be tolerated in our community. We condemn such public exhibition of violence in which the contestants are often battered into insensibility and sometimes killed, as was the case at Wilmington, as evils which have been outlawed in practically every state in the Union and declared by many courts to be public nusiances. They tend to demoralize boys and young men, to arouse pugnacious passions, to brutalize their emotions, to promote idleness, vagrancy and gambling, and to increase the crimes of violence.
- 2. We deplore the action of our legislature in passing special acts to legalize the crime which a former legislature, long ago, denounced as a felony and which has remained on the statue books as a penitentiary offense until quite recently, and we appeal to the good people and the state, who respect law and oppose crime, to take a decided stand with us against this new evil which has so recently sprung up in our commonwealth.
- 3. We hereby instruct our board of temperance and social service to appoint a committee whose duty it shall be to appear before the next legislature and ask that honorable body to repeal the special act heretofore passed, which legalized this crime.

Work at Chapel Hill:

M. T. Plyler presented, and the Secretary read, the following report:

REPORT OF JOINT COMMISSION ON WORK AT CHAPEL HILL

The Joint Commission on Work at Chapel Hill wishes to make the following report:

The exchange of the Algernon Barbee store property with the University of North Carolina for the fraternity lots at the rear of the Seton Barbee lot has been effected, and the sum of fourteen thousand dollars (\$14,000) has been paid the University for the Seton Barbee lot. The deeds for same have been received and recorded.

The general plan of the building program has been completed and approval of the same has been acknowledged by the General Boards of Church Extension and of Sunday School, and the Commission authorized to proceed with the construction as far as the General Boards are concerned. An amount of \$50,000 has been assured by cash, subscriptions and guarantees by the Methodists and friends in the state. The solicitation of subscriptions is to be continued by Rev. Walter Patten until the desired amount is pledged.

The plans and specifications of the Connecting Unit and the Church are in the hands of the contractors for bids and the contract will be let as soon as a bid is accepted.

To meet the needs of the eight hundred Methodist students at the University this year it has been decided that by the co-operation of the Students Class, the local Chapel Hill Church, and the Joint Commission to build a Hut to accommodate about three hundred students at a cost not to exceed \$1000. The students themselves have agreed to furnish a large part of the labor for this enterprise.

Communications:

M. T. Plyler presented, and the Secretary read, the report of the Methodist Mutual Fire Insurance Company. The report was referred to the Committee on Church Property.

Christian Greetings

On motion of H. C. Smith it was ordered that the Secretary be instructed to send Christian greetings to the synod of the Province of Sewanee now in session in St. James Church, this city.

Restoration of Credentials:

N. H. D. Wilson presented a request from the St. Louis Annual Conference that this Conference restore the credentials of J. F. E. Bates, and moved that the request be granted. The Conference declined to restore the credentials.

Sunday School Board:

The report of the Sunday School Board was presented and read by T. M. Grant. The report was adopted.

Your Sunday School Board begs leave to submit the following report:

The past year has been one of marked advancement in our work. Our advancement has been along the same general lines which have marked our course for the past few years, with a few readjustments in our organization and plans of work made necessary by an expanding program. We have directed our efforts toward the attainment of the objectives adopted by this Conference in session at Elizabeth City last year, and we are happy to be able to report that a generous measure of success has crowned our efforts.

Some of the outstanding features in our program for the past year have been (1) the promotion of leadership training work, (2) the placing and checking of Programs of Work, (3) the holding of our first Conference-wide Sunday School Conference at Wilson in April, (4) the initiation of a Sunday School membership campaign, (5) the promotion of evangelism in the Sunday School, (6) definite emphasis on the matter of Sunday School and home cooperation through the observance of Children's Week, (7) the organization of Wesley classes and the securing of reports from classes already organized, and (9) the aiding of building committees in planning buildings in keeping with the requirements of our denomination.

Some indication of the measure of success that has attended our efforts this year is the fact that nearly 2,400 standard training awards were issued as against 1,563 in 1923 and 1,142 in 1922. Fourteen standard training schools were conducted this year, with three in the Durham district, two in the Fayetteville, two in the New Bern, two in the Washington, and one in each of the other districts of the conference. In addittion, non-standard training schools were conducted at Bethel, Rockingham, Hamlet, Rich Square, Bayboro, and Siler City.

One of the most gratifying and what promises to be one of the most resultful features of Sunday School administration in our Conference this year has been the placing and checking of the Programs of Work, or official standards of efficiency for schools, departments, and classes. To date 212 schools have adopted these Programs of Work, and nearly 200 of them have been officially checked, approximately 60 volunteer workers assisting in this splendid work.

Special emphasis has been given to the importance of making our Sunday Schools genuinely evangelistic, ever calling attention to the fact that the aim of the Sunday School is "to lead each" pupil to a knowledge of God's will and acceptance of Jesus Christ as personal Saviour and Lord, and the development of a Christian character expressed through worship, right living, and efficient

service."

We rejoice in the solid foundation which has been laid for our work and call upon presiding elders, pastors, superintendents, teachers, and our people everywhere to continue, with renewed vigor, their splendid co-operation to the end that the Sunday School may meet fully its opportunity and discharge fully its obligation to the boys and girls, men and women, of the state.

In order that we may continue to advance during the coming year, we submit the following recommendations:

- 1. That Standard Training Schools be conducted where the need and attendance will justify, to the end that each district be served by at least one standard school.
- 2. That Cokesbury training schools be conducted, where practicable, in communities not already served by standard training schools.
- That we seek to enroll all presiding elders, pastors, Sunday School Board members, and superintendents as students in the Standard Training Course, taking for credit at least one unit annually.
- 4. That we co-operate with the Board of Managers of the North Carolina Pastors' School in providing courses in Sunday School work.
- 5. That we recognize the educational value of the official Programs of Work for schools, departments, and classes, and continue, with renewed vigor, our efforts to make them operative throughout the conference.
- 6. That a conference-wide Sunday School conference, similar to the one held at Wilson April 1-2-3, 1924, be held early in the year.
- 7. That we co-operate heartily with the General Sunday School Board in its church-wide Sunday School membership campaign.
- That special stress be laid upon the matter of evangelism in the Sunday School and that we recommend to pastors and Sunday School officers and teachers the plan outlined by the General Sunday School Board.
- 9. That we heartily approve and recommend the observance of Children's Week in as many of our churches as practicable.
- 10. That an effort be made to secure the observance of Sunday School Day in all Sunday Schools and that we furnish these schools Sunday School Day programs.
- 11. That we approve the Four-Times-A-Year Institute as a splendid means of cultivating our rural work.
- 12. That we go on record as favoring week-day religious instruction properly correlated with the work done on Sunday, and

call attention to the special materials for schools undertaking this type of work available from the General Sunday School Board.

- 13. That we urge building committees to acquaint themselves with the building standards of their church, available through their Conference Sunday School Board office at Durham and through the Joint Committee on Church and Sunday School Architecture.
- 14. That we recognize the importance of the preservation of the Christian home and endorse the Home and Parent-Teacher work of the General Sunday School Board.
- 15. That we endorse the program of the General Sunday School Board for missionary education in the Sunday School, stressing Monthly Missionary Day and urging all our Sunday Schools, as far as practicable, to accept missionary specials in accordance with the general plan provided by the General Sunday School Board and the Board of Missions.

Your Board gladly announces the re-election of Mr. L. L. Gobbel as Conference Superintendent of Sunday School Work and Miss Georgia S. Keene as conference elementary superintendent, salary same as last year.

THIRD DAY

Friday, November 14, 1924.

The Conference convened at 9:00 a.m., Bishop Denny in the chair.

Devotional Exercises:

Opening devotional exercises were conducted by H. C. Ewing.

Minutes Read:

The minutes of the former session were read, and, after being corrected, were approved.

Trust Fund:

On motion of J. T. Gibbs the President of the Conference was instructed to sign a draft for \$884.00 on the Conference Board of Trustees in favor of the Board of Finance.

Message Received:

The Sccretary read a message from the Synod of the Province of Sewanee of the Protestant Episcopal Church conveying Christian greetings to this Conference.

Conference Relations:

At the request of J. H. Shore, and on motion of R. H. Willis, the name of W. H. Townsend was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the superannuate relation.

On motion of S. A. Cotton the name of D. A. Watkins was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the superannuate relation.

Leave of Absence:

Leave of absence after this session of the Conference was granted N. H. D. Wilson, Daniel Lane and P. H. Williams.

Methodist Summer School:

The report of the Board of Management of the Methodist Summer School was read by the Secretary, and the report was adopted. The report is as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF METHODIST SUMMER SCHOOL

The seventh session of the School was held at Trinity College, June 4-18, 1924. This was the first session of a Standard Pastor's School in co-operation with the General Board of Missions and the General Sunday School Board held at Trinity. The venture proved to be a success in every respect.

Regular courses of instruction for which credit was given were offered as follows:

Rural Church Methods and Rural Church and Community Service-Dr. McConnell.

City Church Administration and Social Teachings of Jesus-Dr. Shattuck.

The Pastor and His Problems and the Conduct of Public Worship-Dr. Young.

Ministers Message for the Needs of To-Day and Studies in Life of Paul—Dr. Anderson.

Rural Sunday School Management and Church and Sunday School Architecture—Mr. Brabham.

Principals of Teaching-Professor Childs.

Recreation-Mr. Burbage.

Bishops Mouzon and Boaz, Dr. Charles E. Jefferson, New York; Dr. Charles R. Erdman, Princeton; and Doctors F. J. Prettyman, W. J. Young, and Stonewall Anderson of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, were heard in inspirational addresses.

Five men from the N. C. Conference received 10 credits; and fourteen from the W. N. C. Conference 74 credits, in undergraduate work.

In advanced work, the record is as follows: 48 from the North Carolina Conference received 88 certificates; and 39 from the Western North Carolina Conference received 77 certificates.

No record of those in attendance who did not work for credits is available though many attended class without trying for credits.

The School is extending its scope each year and bringing in a larger number of instructors and runs for two full weeks. This means larger opportunities and increased expenditures.

We request the two Boards of Education and the two Boards of Missions to continue to contribute \$400 each as hitherto. To meet the increased expenses the two Sunday School Boards are request to contribute \$400 each. This will enable the Treasurer to meet the demands made upon him.

The expenditure is such that every effort should be made to take advantage of the courses offered at Trinity and every pastor whose face is to the future should plan to attend.

We request the Conference to advise the Presiding Elders to so arrange their Quarterly Conferences so as not to interfere with any one who may desire to attend.

Sikes it was ordered that on next Sunday morning a collection be taken in each of the Methodist Churches in the City for the benefit of preachers going from active service to the superannuate relation at this session of the Conference, that the Board of Finance appoint some one to take the collection at each church, and that the amount received be distributed by the Board of Finance.

Lay Activities:

Dr. G. L. Morelock, General Secretary of the Board of Lay Activities was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Admitted into Full Connection:

Question 6 was called, and the following having passed the Examining Committee, and the Committee on Admissions, were examined by Bishop Denny in open Conference, and, upon vote of the Conference, were admitted into full connection: H. K. King, H. L. Davis, F. B. Peele, A. E. Brown, R. J. Lough, E. W. Downum, W. L. Dawson, Jr.

Christian Education:

Dr. R. H. Bennett, of the Virginia Conference, and Secretary of the Department of Ministerial Supply and Training, was introduced, and addressed the Conference in the interest of the Christian Education Movement.

Conference Brotherhood:

Dr. W. P. Few, President of Trinity College, was introduced, and spoke in the interest of the Conference Brother-hood.

Question 21:

Question 21 was called, and all the preachers in the Durham, Elizabeth City, Fayetteville, New Bern and Raleigh

Districts, whose names had not been called, passed the examination of character, those present making report of their work

When the name of W. R. Hardesty was called, his Presiding Elder reported that during the year he had been charged with immorality, that a committee of investigation had found a trial necessary, that the trial had been held, and that the trial committee had found him not guilty.

Board of Missions:

A preliminary report from the Board of Missions was presented and read by Walter Patten, and it was adopted. The report is as follows:

BOARD OF MISSIONS-REPORT NO. 1

The Home, Foreign, and Conference Mission work of our church is confronted with the serious problem of financial maintenance. Mission money must be secured or curtailment and retrenchment are inevitable. To meet this urgency two methods of procedure have been effected:

- 1. Make satisfactory adjustments of our Centenary Pledges.
- 2. The Advance World Program or the acceptance of new and voluntary missionary obligations by the individual churches.

The period from January 15 to March 15 has been designated as the time for the presentation of this movement to our churches. Your conference mission board desires most eagerly to participate in this plan and thus secure for conference missions ten per cent of all the money collected in this Advance Movement as in the Centenary.

Your Mission Boards are faced with the gradual curtailment of its appropriation and its serious consequences unless some means is devised by which its receipts can be maintained. We therefore urge every minister and congregation to enter into this crusade for Missions with a spirit of chivalry that characterized the circuit riders of old.

It is desired that our church meet this urgency in the spirit of Christ and to this end the week of December 7-14 has been set aside in conjunction with the Western N. C. Conference Prayer and Mission study. It is desired also that a special thank offering be received during this special week.

Memorial Service:

On motion of M. T. Plyler it was ordered that when we adjourn today we do so to meet tomorrow afternoon a 3:00 o'clock for the Memorial Service.

Joint Commission:

The Secretary read the report of the Joint Commission representing the Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in North Carolina, and it was adopted. The report is as follows:

REPORT OF JOINT COMMISSION

The joint commission representing the conferences of the Methodist Protestant Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in North Carolina submits the following annual report:

In our efforts to secure closer and more intimate co-operation between our two churches, we are much interested in the action taken by the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in approving the Plan for the union of the two Episcopal Methodisms. Following this action in May of the present year, the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, assembled in special session in July following, approved the same plan.

The General Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church at its regular session in May passed the following resolution submitted by a special committee appointed by the General Conference.

"The General Conference has heard with delight the message of Bishop Anderson sent by the Methodist Episcopal Church, and of Doctor Millar sent by the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. In both messages we have been invited to participate in the unification of Methodism. We reciprocate heartily the sentiments expressed and the invitation extended. We favor and long for a united Methodism. Not understanding perfectly the present scheme of unification between these two churches we yet believe it would be possible for us to come in on such terms as would not require us to surrender the fundamental principles of the Methodist Protestant Church in the zone of church government. That we may satisfy ourselves on this point, we are authorizing a committee to receive any communications it may please you to make, to give them careful consideration, and to report the same to us. This letter was approved by unanimous yote."

Never before has there been such significant action taken by these three great Methodist bodies looking to the ultimate union of American Methodism. We, in the words of the above resolution, "favor and long for a united Methodism," and hail with joy this day.

To provide a practical method of procedure, we recommend that whenever there is an effort to make readjustments between our two churches so as to make for efficiency and economy in the work of our two churches that the President of the Methodist Protestant Conference and the Presiding Elder involved be and is hereby constituted a Board of Mediation to act with the parties interested in doing the work enterprised.

Your Hospital Board regrets that so few Golden Cross Societies have been organized during this Conference Year. We urge the pastors to appoint a Golden Cross Director in each church at once, in order that the church membership may be enrolled in our Golden Cross Societies during the Thanksgiving season, as required by our church law.

Epworth League Board:

The report of the Epworth League Board was read by E. L. Hillman, and it was adopted. The report is as follows:

REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD

Your Epworth League Board wishes to express its continued interest in the training of the young people of our great church. While the world is making a strong appeal to our boys and girls it is the purpose of this Board, by the co-operation of the Presiding Elders, the Pastors and Laymen here assembled, that our young people shall be saved for a life of faithful service for God and his Church.

The Epworth League has made great advancement here in our Conference during the past year as is shown by the report of our Epworth League Conference President, Rev. T. M. Grant, to our Conference Board. Three hundred and fifty of the young people of the various Churches of our Conference attended the Summer Assembly at Morehead City last June: a number which exceeds by one hundred and twenty-five the attendance of any previous session of our Assembly. We wish to express our deep appreciation to Brother Grant and his co-workers for faithful services they have rendered the League work of our Conferences this year. The report of the general Secretary to our Conference Board reveals the fact that in the thirty annual Conferences there was a gain of five hundred and seventy-four chapters and seven thousand four hundred and thirty-eight members in the Epworth League the past year. We feel confident that the Epworth League is sustaining a growth that is commensurate with the other departments of our Church.

In order that a greater promotion of this work shall come about we would enlist the enthusiastic and zealous support of every pastor and Christian worker to that end. Leadership will not perish from that church whose pastor is ever alert to the cause of the Epworth League. Your Conference Board respectfully urges that

pastors and laymen become more active in promoting the work of the young people. We wish that unusual emphasis may be put upon our Epworth Leagues in the coming year.

We recommend to our pastors that they give special recognition and help to the Leagues in their charge by meeting regularly with the monthly council meeting of the Epworth Leagues thus giving to the young people their counsel and advice, and (2) by giving public recognition of the Epworth League in every charge by observing the installation of the League officers at a regular church service. The Epworth League provides a calendar which is very suggestive of a helpful program of service, and will do much to vitalize the Epworth League work in every church and chapter observing it.

It is the further wish of the Board to recommend the regular observance of Anniversary Day in all our congregations with or without an Epworth League. We would emphasize the support and attendance upon our District Institutes, Epworth League General Assembly and that all our Leagues make regular use of the space given us in our Advocate.

We desire faithfully to co-operate with our General Epworth League Board, our Conference League and our General Secretary. Respectfully submitted,

Temperance and Social Service:

The report of the Board of Temperance and Social Service was read by R. L. Davis, and it was adopted. The report is as follows:

REPORT OF BOARD OF TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

Boxing Matches

This Board appoints Rev. W. A. Stanbury, W. T. Shaw, and Chas. S. Wallace as a committee to report the resolution against boxing passed by this Conference to the General Assembly.

Child Welfare

We call attention of the officers and citizens to sections 4438, 4439, and 4442 of the Consolidated Statutes of North Carolina, for the protection of child welfare. These forbid the selling or giving of cigarettes or tobacco in the form of cigarettes to minors under the age of seventeen or allowing such minors to enter billiard or pool rooms or bowling alleys.

Divorce Laws

This Board calls the attention of the Church to the growing disregard of the marriage vows, and the easy divorce laws now on our Statute books and commends to the General Assembly the Biblical grounds for divorce as the only safe rule for the life of the Nation and her citizens.

Sunday Amusements

We warn our people against participating in Sunday base ball, Sunday swimming pools and Sunday movies.

Carnivals, Vaudeville, Picture Shows

It is the sense of your Committee that we should call attention to the evil effects of these upon the morals and health of our communities. Some concrete examples of these were before us, that were alarming and revealing profanity and obscenity.

We wish to call attention to this and to call upon the policemen to remember that they are under solemn oath to enforce the laws and to call their attention to the fact that profanity and obscenity on our streets and highways is strictly forbidden by the laws of our State.

Law Enforcement

This Board is glad to note the splendid progress that is being made by the Government and State in the matter of law enforcement, especially as it applies to the 18th Amendment. More and more the people are respecting the prohibition law, and reverence for law is impressing itself upon the people as a duty. Four years ago the enforcement of the 18th Amendment was very largely taken as a joke, but with the passing of time the sentiment has grown and fewer people laugh at the law.

The prohibition unit of the Federal Government and the rum chasers to protect our coast are doing splendid work, and scores of valuable boats in the service of the rum runners have been captured and confiscated.

The work of the Anti-Saloon League is telling throughout the church and Christian citizens are awaking to their responsibility, not only to keep the law, but to assist the officers in enforcing the law. As regards this, the Board calls attention to the provision of the discipline for the appointing of social service committees in the local churches and call the attention of all such committees to the provision in Section 13 of the Turlington Act. By using this law the local committee can initiate a cleaning up of the liquor traffic in their respective communities.

W. Towe read the report of the Bible Society Board, and it was adopted. The report is as follows:

BIBLE SOCIETY BOARD

The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, has ever stood for an open Bible for the world as the revelation of God's wonderful plan of redemption for fallen man. It has obediently endeavored to carry out the great Commission of our Lord, Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel. Realizing these facts it behooves us to assist in putting the Holy Bible in the hands of every person. Recognizing that the American Bible Society to be the greatest agency for that purpose, we, your Bible Board do heartily recom: mend:

- 1. That, owing to the destruction of its great plant in Japan by the earthquake, a free will offering be taken on Bible Sunday in every charge to assist in replenishing that much needed plant.
- 2. That our people be requested to use its Annuity Plan as explained in its literature, when it is practicable.
- 3. That our pastors be requested to secure, free of cost, its tracts and other literature for distribution from Dr. M. B. Porter, Secretary, South Atlantic Agency, No. 218 N. Adam St., Richmond, Va., which will inform our people as to the great work it is doing.

Christian Literature:

The report of the Board of Christian Literature was read by R. H. Broom, and it was adopted. The report is as follows:

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

From year to year we become more humbly conscious of the growing responsibility resting on the members of this comparatively young Board wisely to advise as to the vital interest committed to our consideration. Startling statements submitted to us by accredited representatives of our various publications; frequent commission of crime by the young, despite boasted improvement in educational methods; the lack of trained leaders in the church activities, and the persistent presentation of immoral books in picture form—all these conditions emphasize the necessity and importance of an effectual counteractant, just such as is to be found in Christian literature. For the safety and happiness of our homes; for the proper training of our boys and girls efficiently to serve

the church, and for the larger relief of our Conference Claimants, we urge our people to buy and read our own books and periodicals. Why should not every pastor act as a colporteur, and every Sunday School have a good library, as used to be the case in many sections of our church?

Publishing House

The annual statement to which we have had access carries unprecedented gains, and the dividend which is distributed to the superanuated preachers, their wives, widows, and dependant children is \$60,000, or 100% over any previous year. Such gratifying progress ought to encourage pastors and people to maintain the highest degree of denominational or Christian loyalty. With property valued at \$2,400,000, and with sales amounting to \$2,200,000, we begin to see something of the splendid proportions to which our publishing interests have attained; and this is but the earnest, we hope, of far greater things.

Our Publishing Agents, Messrs. Lamar and Barton, are men of integrity, and we heartily endorse their economic and progressive management of our varied publishing interests, and commend them to our people's confidence and patronage. Mr. Barton's visit to this Board was much enjoyed, and he brought us a message full of good cheer. And we feel that the whole church should encourage our Agents in their endeavors to furnish literature suited to our young people's needs.

Among the praiseworthy products are our Methodist Review and Christian Advocate, and Epworth League and Sunday School periodicals, all of superior quality. We believe that in these is found the best thought relative to the many interests of our great Church. We insist that our membership freely unite with our pastors in their persistent efforts very largely to increase the distribution of this high-toned literature.

NORTH CAROLINA CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE

Of the sixteen Conference Organs we are pleased to note that our own stands head, especially in the saneness and soundness of editorial lead, and in the economy and wisdom of business conduct. While we regret the loss of 872 subscribers, we recommend the careful revision of the mailing list annually, and endorse the plans for gaining 4000 subscribers in this conference at the least, in the 70th anniversary campaign in the early part of next year, and that the districts accept the following distribution: Durham, 475; Elizabeth City, 425; Fayetteville, 475; New Bern, 425; Raleigh, 425; Rockingham, 475; Washington, 475; Weldon, 425; Wilmington, 425.

Rev. T. A. Sikes be appointed as Business Manager is requested, his salary being \$4,500.

We feel that this interest is of such importance as that it should share in the Annual Conference anniversaries, and we have reason to believe that it will in the near future.

Lay Activities:

The report of the Board of Lay Activities was read by W. P. Few, and it was adopted. The report is as follows:

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The Board of Lay Activities with a much larger attendance than ever before, and after careful deliberation, voted unanimously to carry through this year, with the co-operation of the Presiding Elders and Pastors, the following undertakings:

- 1. That we set as our first goal the payment in full of all salaries and of all conference collections for the year 1925. To this end we request the Presiding Elders and Pastors to use the Lay Leaders to set up early in the year a financial program in accordance with Paragraph Three below, and toward the close of the year to use them in such final efforts as may be necessary to complete all collections in all churches.
- 2. That we commit ourselves to a concerted conference-wide movement for stewardship cultivation and an appeal to all our members for loyalty to the great unfinished tasks of the Centenary, the Christian Education Movement, and the Special Efforts now being made for the benefit of our superannuated preachers.
- 3. That a thoroughgoing Every-Member Canvass be undertaken in every church as soon as possible after the adjournment of this Conference, and along such general lines as are laid down on pages 35 and 36 of our Manual of Lay Activities; and that every member of the church be urged to make weekly payments, or monthly payments in the case of church members who belong to circuits that do not have preaching every Sunday.
- 4. That a detailed financial report be made to the congregation of every church at stated times and that early in each Conference year full explanations to be made to each congregation of every item included in the collections and expenditures for the year.

We strongly urge this recommendation, to the end that intelligent and systematic giving may be secured from every member of the church.

- 5. That Boards of Lay Activities in all the districts, in all the circuits, and in all the churches be formed, organized, and made effective; and that the committees required by Paragraph 547 of the Dicipline of 1922 be appointed, organized, and set to work.
- .6. That names be put in conspicious places on our churches, and that appropriate signs be placed about hotels, railway stations and on public highways.
- 7. That the second Sunday in June be set apart as Laymen's Day and that we undertake to have laymen hold services in every church during the absence of pastors attending the Preacher's Institute at Trinity College, and that we furthermore offer to provide a service in every community every Sunday by the use of lay speakers.

- 8. That we seek to promote a true revival of religion in the Church to the extent that the laity of the church will engage in personal evangelism and all become witnesses for Jesus Christ.
- 9. That we will make an honest effort to organize the Wesley Brotherhood in every church.
- 10. That we pledge ourselves to obtain 700 subscribers to The Methodist Layman.

The Board recommends that W. P. Few be re-elected Conference Lay Leader.

Orphanage:

The report of the Orphanage Committee was read by W. C. Benson. A. S. Barnes spoke to the report. The report was adopted, and is as follows:

REPORT OF THE ORPHANAGE COMMITTEE

Your Orphanage Committee desires to make the following report:

We deeply appreciate the continued growth of the institution along material lines. It should be a matter of encouragement to the Conference to note that the building program which was put on a year or more ago is rapidly taking shape. The Vann School and Administration building which is in the course of construction, a three story structure, will be completed next June. This building will be one of the most modern and up to date buildings of its kind in the State.

The building in which the dining room is located, and which has been completed, is now in use, a unique and wonderfully appointed building. The Atwater cottage, the gift of the Atwater family and friends, is about completed, and withal a beautiful building.

We deplore the death of Brother S. C. Vann, the chief benefactor of the orphanage, who has recently died. We pray that there may be others to take his place. This great and good man devoted his means and heart to the enlargement of our orphanage.

The children at the orphanage now number 250 which is practically the limit of its present capacity.

We appreciate the support of the Sunday Schools over the Conference in the way of specials and would urge a continuation of their liberal support. We recommend that Thanksgiving services be held in all the churches of the Conference and an offering be taken and sent direct to the orphanage. We urge these and other specials to adequately meet the needs of the institution in addition to the assessments, since the assessments do not cover half the current expenses of the orphanage. It is not the wish of the committee or board of trustees to increase the assessment, but to make up the difference by free-will offerings through the Sunday Schools and Churches.

Legacies: The orphanage has not received any large legacies during the past Conference year. We wish to urge the importance of our people remembering the orphanage in their wills, and that the preachers in their pastoral visiting suggest to their people to do this splendid thing.

An industrial building, a baby cottage, and an additional dormitory are needed at the orphanage. We have plans and specifications already in hand, and would urge that funds be raised through specials that these buildings may be completed at an early date.

The singing class has gone out on Sundays during the Fall and Spring and as often as they could during July and August. They visited as many of the different charges as they could reach.

The purpose of these visits was not primarily to raise money but to demonstrate the character of the work being done at the institution. From all sections of the Conference where the class has gone, they have received very hearty commendation.

The report of the Board of Church Extension was read by J. E. Holden, and it was adopted. The report is as follows:

BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

The Board of Church Extension, for several years has been putting the chief emphasis on the accumulation of an adequate loan fund. And year by year becomes more painfully certain of the urgency of this need. And we wish to remind our pastors and friends of this great cause that they can render great service by discussing, and helping our people to make their wills so as to include this cause. Our Elders can help wonderfully at District Conferences. Our present Loan Fund capital is \$18,618. 67. Attention has been called to the fact that our people are painfully slow in paying loans made to them in good faith. They thus paralize the Boards, and retard the work. Unless we take our obligations more seriously great hurt will result.

We again insist on adequate church plans, which may be had by writing to Board of Church Extension, Louisville, Ky. Church property protection is furnished also by this Board at cost. Write the Board in regard to these things before starting a building.

Report of the Duke Commission is appended and explains itself. Your Board wishes again to express its deep appreciation to Mr. J. B. Duke for this splendid and timely aid to this great cause.

The assessment for the general Board for next year is \$8,103, and for Conference work, \$8,000.

The Executive Committee meets about March 1 to recommend applications to General Board, and all applications to that Board must be in hands of Conference Secretary by that date, or fail to get on Calendar.

The report of the Board of Education was read by H. E. Myers. The following spoke to the report: A. W. Mohn, A. D. Wilcox, S. B. Turrentine, H. M. North. The report was adopted, and is as follows:

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Believing in the permanent values represented in and served by the Christian Education Movement, we are encouraged by the work being done in this field and wish to renew our allegiance to its causes and seek to bring the movement to a successful conclusion. To this end we recommend that this Conference continue to unite heartily in the effort being made to collect the pledges now due this fund, stressing this through the period from the close of this Conference to January 15th, 1925, and observing the week of January 4th to the 11th as Education Week.

That true religion growing out of a right conceptoin of God and proper relation to one's fellows enters fundamentally into the making of all real character, is a conviction on which all of us should be agreed as a Christian people. We therefore commend the General Board for the steps taken in naming a representative to care for the general religious interests of students in Church and state institutions of higher learning. Continuing the effort begun several years ago looking to formulating a plan for religious instruction in tax-supported institutions, the Board continues H. M. North, H. E. Myers, W. A. Graham. a Committee to study this subject and act in such representative way as they may be called on with similar committees from other denominations.

Faced with the hurtful results both to the man and to the church coming from the too free use of the two-thirds rule in admitting men on trial into the traveling connection, we recommend that the district conferences report no applicants for admission on trial who have not had at least two years of college work. To further the efforts of the church to prepare and train her spiritual leaders, we urge that the chairman of the several committees on the conference courses of study early after each session of the Annual Conference communicate with the members of their classes and insist that each member enroll for his work with the Correspondence School and attend the Pastor's School at Trinity College.

TRINITY COLLEGE

This splendid institution continues to grow in the numbers served and in the effectiveness of the service. The number of students now registered totals 1117 as against 1008 on this date last year. Emphasizing a standing policy of providing for the whole life of those in its care, the College has secured a Dean for Freshmen and for the Freshmen Faculty, provided additional members of the staff employed to care for the women students, and has also provided a plan for thorough physical training designed to reach the entire student body. The Board commends the move

ment looking to realizing the vision of the honored Braxton Craven in building up a Teachers' College. The large increase in the summer school in Durham, the new but successful venture at Oriental this past summer in summer school work, and the proposed summer session for teachers at Lake Junaluska are steps leading to this early ideal of the great founder.

GREENSBORO COLLEGE

Building on the background of great ideals and traditions the present day work sustains the worthy reputation of this honored institution. A larger faculty, a larger number of students in attendence, addition of equipment mark its work. The Board recommends the endorsement of the plan of the Board of Trustees for \$500,000.00 for endowment. It records its pleasure in the gift of \$5,000.00 by Mr. W. W. Flowers and the gift of \$25,000.00 by Mr. Benjamin N. Duke to this fund.

LOUISBURG FEMALE COLLEGE

Following the grant of permission by this Conference last year, the Trustees have placed bonds for and erected a new dormitory. We recommend a renewal of the endorsement given the general plans last year, and suggest the endorsement of the effort for raising \$500,000.00 for endowment and for better equipping this school. We wish to express appreciation of the recent gift of \$30,000.00 by Mr. R. H. Wright of Durham, completing his gift of \$50,000.00 for a memorial loan fund.

CAROLINA COLLEGE

Advances mark the work of this school. The practical completion of Mercer Hall without debt adds near \$50,0000.00 to the value of the plant and furnishes space and equipment greatly needed in the work of the institution. A successful summer school was carried on through the summer this year and is in line with the larger service that is being rendered.

Statistical Question 33-35 were called and answered. (See Condensed Minutes)

Church Property:

C. T. Thrift read the report of the Committee on Church Property, and it was adopted. The report is as follows:

REPORT OF BOARD ON CHURCH PROPERTY

Your Committee submits the following report:

The number of church buildings in the North Carolina Conference is 758, a decrease of four. The value of these buildings is \$6,187,371, an increase of \$312,300. The indebtedness on these buildings is \$397,411, an increase of \$22,742,

There are nine district parsonages valued at \$87,500, with an indebtedness of \$3,200. Then on 214 parsonages belonging to pastoral charges, an increase of five. Their value is \$1,032,950, a gain of \$23,300. The indebtedness is \$136,638, an increase of \$3,009.

This gives a total valuation of church buildings and parsonages of \$7,230,321, and a total indebtedness of \$537,269.

The amount of insurance carried on these buildings with the Board of Church Extension is \$80,350, a decrease of \$76,500; other insurance carried amounts to \$2,442,230, an increase of \$132,515. The total insurance carried is \$2,522,580. The premiums paid to Board of Church Extension is \$718; to other companies, \$9,865. The total primium paid is \$14,583.

Three churches and no parsonages were damaged last year. The amount of the damage was \$73. The amount collected on these claims was \$58.

We urge the trustees of church property to exercise great care

and diligence in the proper recording of and keeping all deeds to church property, and then the "trust clause" inserted in all deeds to new property.

We urge our people to make our church buildings and grounds as beautiful and attractive as possible, and to keep the interior neat and clean.

We urge our pastors, their wives and children, to take the best possible care of the parsonages and their furnishings, in which they live and to leave them in the cleanest and most attractive condition for those who follow them. Trees will enhance the comfort and value of parsonage property, and shrubs and flowers will add to their beauty.

We recommend the consolidation of the weak churches whenever possible that the number of churches on pastoral charges may be so reduced that it will be possible for every church to have religious services conducted by the pastor every Sunday.

We recommend that whenever possible the existing one room church buildings be remoddled so as to provide better facilities for carrying on more efficiently the important work of the Sunday School, and that all new churches be built on modern plans.

We would especially call the attention of our people to the matter of adequate insurance. The total amount of insurance carried is just a little over one-third of the total value of the property and many churches and parsonages are not protected at all. We recommend to our people the Methodist Mutual Fire Insurance Company of Statesville. The report of the Board of Directors of this Company shows that it is in good condition, carrying insurance to the amount of \$1,766,755 which represents an increase of \$66,778 over the previous year. There were no losses to pay during the year.

Finally, we recommend the re-election of Rev. M. T. Plyler as director, whose term shall expire October, 1929.

Question 9:

Question 9 was called, and the Bishop announced the transfer of J. H. Lanning, a deacon in the class of the 3rd year, from the Pacific Conference.

Committee Appointed:

On motion of H. M. North, F. S. Love and H. E. Myers were appointed a committee to prepare resolutions of thanks to be presented at the closing session of the Conference Sunday night.

Collection Taken:

Upon the suggestion of R. H. Willis a collection was taken with which to reimburse J. T. Gibbs for expenses incurred in preparing the manuscript which the Conference had requested him to write.

Board of Missions:

Walter Patten read Report No. 2 from the Board of Missions, and it was adopted. The report is as follows:

BOARD OF MISSIONS, REPORT NO. 2

Duke Fund

Your Board of Missions would again remind you of the liberality of Mr. James B. Duke in his annual contribution of \$5,000. for the mission work of this conference. Without this money the salaries of many of our ministers would be much less than they are now and your board wishes to express its appreciation and thanks for this spirit of helpfulness.

Regrouping of Churches

Your Board believes that it is necessary and advisable to regroup many of our circuits to make them stronger and more efficient in their ministry. We would solicit the co-operation of many of our laymen with our Presiding Elders when it seems practicable and wise to effect such consolidations. Your Board recommends that Rev. A. D. Wilcox be continued Conference Missionary Secretary without salary. Rev. Walter Patten has been appointed to succeed himself as the representative of the Mission Board on the Duke Fund Commission.

DURHAM DISTRICT

Discontinue Eno as a charge and place it with Hillsboro Circuit. Divide Graham and Haw River and Webb Avenue and make two charges—Graham-Haw River and Webb Avenue. Create a new charge to be known as West Burlington.

ELIZABETH CITY DISTRICT

Divide Roanoke Island charge and create Manteo and Wanchese.

NEW BEFN DISTRICT

From St. Paul take Saulston and add to Goldsboro Circuit. Add Riverside to Bridgeton Circuit and name charge Riverside-Bridgeton.

RALEIGH DISTRICT

Divide Cary Circuit. Take Cary, Apex and Macedonia from Cary Circuit and Merry Oaks from the Buckhorn Circuit in the Fayetteville District and form the Cary-Apex Charge. Take Fuquay and Holly Springs from the Cary Circuit and Cokesbury, Olive Branch and Buckhorn from the Buckhorn Circuit and form Fuquay Circuit, thus absorbing the Buckhorn Circuit. From Franklinton take Wesley and from Youngsville Circuit take Rock Springs and form Franklinton Circuit. Take Knightdale from Zebulon and add to Millbrook Circuit.

ROCKINGHAM DISTRICT

Discontinue Beulah and Orville churches on the Montgomery Circuit and let Montgomery Circuit take charge of the property. From Troy take Cappelsia and attach it to Montgomery Circuit.

WASHINGTON DISTRICT

From Ayden take Macedonia and add to Robersonville Circuit. From Grimesland Circuit take Winterville and attach it to Ayden. From Calvary Circuit in the Washington District take Sims and add to the Bailey Circuit in the Raleigh District. Take the remainder of Calvary charge and attach to First Church, Wilson. Discontinue Barefoots Chapel and let First Church, Wilson Quarterly Conference take charge of the property.

JOHN EDMUND UNDERWOOD

As winter had passed and the snows and ice had given away to the soft mellow sunshine of spring, when the birds had returned from the prison of winter and their songs were filling the earth with an enchanting melody, and all earth seemed to conspire to give glory to God, and when new life and new hopes were being experienced, it was fitting that the imprisonned soul of John Edmund Underwood be released from the world of uncertainty and soar away to be with the perfect souls in a place free from toil and suffering. The body had been weak for a long time, but the spirit had been alert and pining to go away and mingle with kindred spirits in a land that is far from disease and death.

In the falling of this tall oak in the Methodist forest many hearts have been made sad and the tears come unbidden to many eyes. His life has been a haven of refuge for so many in the hour of need. As the little sparrow could find safety from its prey among the bows and foliage of the tree, so in the great soul of this man many fainting hearts have sought refuge and strength, and received comfort and been made to know that the life of a good man is a "hiding place in the time of storm." There are many in eastern North Carolina who had almost given up the fight but in the darkest hour and at the time when it seemed that all was lost, the figure of this faithful itinerant appeared through the mist and like a bird fleeing to its hiding place, have gone to his side and no one ever went without going away with a vision of better things and a more determined effort to fight harder the battles of life and win through faith in the conquering Christ.

Not once, but many times, this faithful servant of the cross has come to the home of the writer when gloom was lurking about, but "his presence dispersed our gloom and made all within to rejoice." He believed much in the power and efficacy of prayer, and when that which was calculated to bring a heart pang appeared on the horizon he would say, "Let's pray." Brother (Underwood prayed. One could but feel when he was on his knees, either in

the home of before the public, that he had hold of the horns of the altar.

There are a number of young men in the ministry today, and in other walks of life, who are indebted to Brother Underwood for their education. He asked several district Conferences and churches to assist him in this fine work, but what these lacked in furnishing this good man took from his own salary and supplied. Eternity alone will reveal the number thus helped by one, who, to a large degree, had lacked the advantages of early training and who so keenly felt this lack that he was determined others should not be thus handicapped if it were possible for him to prevent it.

He was not a great pulpiteer, as men count greatness, but his earnestness and manner of presenting the truths of the gospel were so gripping that it was impossible to listen to him without determining to try to live a little better.

His faith in the final triumph of the church was simple and beautiful. He was as sure that "Jesus shall reign where ever the sun does his successive journeys run," as he was of his own existence.

Brother Underwood was a man of strong conviction. It took some time for him to reach a conclusion, but when once he had made up his mind it took convincing evidence to change it. He had courage to relate his convictions to his preaching and living. He has said to the writer that if it became necessary he believed that he could die for Christ's sake as willing as he would lie down on his bed at night, and no one, who knew him, would doubt this statement.

He had expressed the desire to continue in the active ranks to the end, but this was denied him. A fall, while living in Goldsboro, had left him in a weakened physical condition, which made it necessary for him to be unusually careful with himself. Just as he was closing his quadrennium as presiding elder of the Raleigh District, he was in an automobile wreck, receiving injuries from which he aever fully recovered. His friends thought it would be wise for him to allow his mantle to be laid on other shoulders and for him to take a year's rest; but he

wanted to work, and was sent to St. John and Gibson where he served during the year of 1920. His loved ones saw that the strong frame was yielding to time and disease, and before the next session of Conference, it was apparent that his work was done. For some time he was in a sanitorium in another state but was brought back to the state he loved most and entered an institution where one of his best friends, Dr. Albert Anderson, was in charge. That beloved friend and medical adviser watched as tenderly over him as a mother watches her babe. At the "staff hour" each morning Dr. Anderson had Brother Underwood to read from God's word and lead in prayer. Those in charge of the institution will testify to the fact that these morning religious exercises were exceedingly helpful.

Rev. John Edmund Underwood was born on October 24, 1854, in Stanley County, and was the son of Isaiah H. and Mary C. Underwood. He was converted under the ministry of Rev. J. W. Puett, and joined old Rehobeth Church in Stanley County, during the summer of 1886. His first marriage was with Miss Sarah Ella Allen. They together went to their fields of labor assigned to them by the church and at all times went gladly and with their faces toward the morning. To this union were born eight children, two boys and six girls. His wife died September 2, 1888. His second marriage was with Mrs. Fannie Clark Lentz, on July 23, 1890, and to this marriage one boy and two girls were born. At the end of a useful life, and after having served the church in a most acceptable manner for thirty-five years, he was transferred to the church above on April 8, 1924.

The funeral of this dead comrade was held in St. John Methodist Church, Goldsboro, on April 10th. The services were conducted by Rev. J. C. Wooten, presiding elder of the New Bern District, and Rev. M. Bradshaw, of the Durham District, the latter giving a brief discourse on the life and character of their departed friend. The following ministers were present: Revs. C. L. Read, R. E. Atkinson, D. H. Tuttle, V. P. Scoville, H. C. Ewing, A. S. Barnes, M. Bradshaw, J. C. Wooten, R. W. Bailey, L. T. Singleton, W. C. Merritt and W. O. Butler. The interment

was in the Willow Dale Cemetery amid the tears of his loved ones and sorrow of many sympathetic friends.

Brother Underwood was admitted into the North Carolina Conference on trial in the fall of 1883, and began his ministry on the Big Lick, Mission in Stanley County, where he served two years. He was next appointed to the Granville Circuit where he remained for two years. He was then sent to Mt. Tirzah Circuit where he served a full quadrennium. From that time his appointments were as follows: Burlington Station, 1892-93; Rocky Mount Station, 1894-5-6; Washington Station, 1897-98; Warrenton District, 1899-1900-02; Elizabeth City District, 1902-04-05; Rockingham Station, 1906-7-8-9: Warrenton District, 1910-1911; New Bern District, 1912-13-14-15; Raleigh District, 1916-17-18-19; St. John and Gibson, 1920. At the session of conference held at Rocky Mount in 1920 he took the superannuate relation, which he sustained until his translation.

Brother Underwood's son, Mr. Samuel B. Underwood, who was one of God's noblemen and one of the best friends a Methodist preacher ever had, who made an enviable record in the educational life of North Carolina, and who died Tuesday morning, November 4, 1924, a few weeks after the death of his father, wrote a very beautiful tribute in appreciation of his life, and, under the circumstances we feel that it is fitting that it be incorporated in this paper. It is given in full.

"Because of my deep seated veneration and profound respect for the Methodist itinerancy, I am moved to pay them this slight tribute by sitting down some characteristics of one who typefied for me some of their highest virtues—my father, John Edmund Underwood.

"The whole of his mature life was given unstintedly to the service of God and his fellow men in the work of the Methodist ministry. In all his years of labor and sacrifice I do not thing he ever considered himself for a moment. His call was clear and unquestioned. Many a time I have heard him describe it. To him it was the very voice of God and he gave it unswerving obedience. Through the long years on circuits in city churches, and as presiding elder, he was ever true to the vision splendid.

"I do not think he ever gave thought to the kind of apopintment he might receive nor to the salary to be paid. In our most intimate talks I never heard him express even the slightest desire to be sent to any particular place. He was a true soldier, ever ready to be sent anywhere to battle for the Lord.

"And he did battle. I never knew a man more true to his convictions nor more loyal to his high ideals. He was a courageous representative of the Most High. He was in the forefront of the fight for prohibition in the hard years of the campaign. He was in the midst of a number of local option contests and carried the battle always into the camp of the enemy. He asked no quarter and gave none. In all his pastoral and ministerial relations he was outspoken in his condemnation of sin. He never put on the soft pedal. He did not know how.

"He would not be classed as a great preacher, but there was something about his sermons that gripped. He went to their delivery from his knees and an open Bible, and he preached the word simply, plainly, directly. God gave him souls for his hire.

"He was a genuine shepherd of his flock. He knew and loved his people, visited them in their homes and places of business, entered into their joys and their sorrows, carrying himself always as an ambassador of God. a short time ago I had an experience that was a joy and an inspiration. I made a pilgrimage to the country community in which he labored for four years during his early ministry. I traveled the roads that he went over, visited my mother's grave in the country church yard, and mingled for a brief season with some of those who had known and loved him. His name had become a sort of sacred tradifion in the community. I was told many tender and intimate things about the relationship between preacher and people, including the story of how, when he came to leave, one of the stalwart men of the neighborhood, who had been brought into the church under his ministry, climbed to the top of his house and with a telescope watched my father as he drove out of sight down the red clay road.

"Denied in his youth the advantage of extensive schol-

astic training, he was yet a well trained man mentally. He read widely and knew books and people. His mind was vigorous and alert and never let go a proposition until it had been fought through. His power of expression was remarkable and his diction was chaste. He had regular hours for study and his grasp of problems of church and state was sure. He was never guilty of the sin of preaching a poorly prepared sermon.

"And what a vigorous champion of education he was! The church schools and colleges had in him a constant and faithful defender. I do not know how many young men and young women he encouraged to go to college, nor to how many he rendered financial assistance out of his own meager salary.

"As a pastor and as a presiding elder he was constantly seeking some young fellow out of obscurity, putting him in the way of securing and education, and perhaps leading his mind and heart to the ministry. One of those wrote me:

"What he meant to me no one can ever know. He picked me up out of insignificance and ignorance and inspired and trained me. What I am I owe to him and to God through him."

"He had a sort of passion for encouraging and helping the young ministers under his supervision. I think every one of them looked upon him as something more than an official superivisor. He was to them a tender and sympathetic friend and counsellor. In fact, he loved all Methodist preachers as if they were his blood brothers and was never happier than when in their company. He would have shared the last crust with any of them. Sometimes, he almost did this.

"My father was something of an ecclesiastical statesmon. He knew church policy and polity. In all the conferences from quarterly to general, he gave wise council and safe advise. When any interest of his church was being attacked he was a veritable lion in her defense.

"The religion of Jesus Christ was to him the chief fact of existance. His faith was simple and all-embracing. He knew the power of God and was himself strong through this power. All that he did was born of a conscious endeavor to carry out the wishes of his great Commander. His communion with the Father was close and intimate. He knew the way to the throne. He talked to God and heard his answering voice. Out of all this came a tender and consuming love for all of God's children. He wanted them all in the fold and suffered when they did not come.

"He literally wore himself out in the service of his Lord. He took his work seriously, too seriously I sometimes thought. His was an intense nature, and the breaking down of his giant frame was hastened by this very intensity. The problems that he had to face bore heavily upon him, and he never succeeded in throwing aside the cares and responsibilities of his office. Human nature could not stand the strain. As his duties became more complex and exacting he drew more and more heavily upon his vital resources and finally the account was overdrawn.

"He had often expressed the wish that he might die in harness, but it was not to be. Came superannuation and the waiting for the end. A little more than three years he lingered on the threshold waiting for the door to open. The body wasted away and the mind became tired and worn, but the spirit was strong to the end. He lived on the experiences that he had stored up through the years. His mind went back and traveled some of the old paths again. His talk was of the bishop, of brother so and so, of some service which he had held or thought he was going to hold, of going home, of rest.

"During the mornings he was usually quiet. In the old days he had spent his morning at his desk, in prayer and study. In the afternoons he would become restless and walk and walk and walk, until he was exhausted. In the old days he had spent his afternoons going in and out among the people. God was close to him in the waiting and even in his last days he was an inspiration to those about him.

"He did not go alone or empty handed to his God. All through the journey he gathered his sheep about him.

"Thou wouldst not alone
Be saved, my Father! Alone
Conquer and come to this goal,
Leaving the rest in the wild.

We were weary, and we Fearful, and we in our march Fain to drop down and to die. Still thou turndest, and still Beckondest the trembler, and still Gave us the weary thy hand If, in the paths of the world, Stones might have wounded thy feet, Toil or dejection have tried Thy spirit, of that we saw Nothing: to us thou wast still Cheerful, and helpful and firm. Therefore to thee it was given Many to save, thyself And at the end of thy day, A faithful shepherd to come Bringing thy sheep in thy hand."

MILTON DAVIS HIX

Rev. Milton Davis Hix was born in Randolph County on July fourth in 1863, and on December 3, 1923 God called him to his eternal reward. Brother Hix was the youngest child of Cornelius and Elizabeth Hix. His mother was a member of the noted Burkhead family which has made valuable contribution to the Methodist Church; having given sons and grandsons to the ministry, both in North Carolina and Texas. This family has also given granddaughters to the mission fields. After attending the schools of his community, Brother Hix spent one year in school at Palmerville Academy in Stanley County and two years in the old Bingham School located at Mebane. He then entered the field of education and taught a few years in Randolph and Montgomery Counties.

While engaged in teaching, he was converted and joined the Church at Oak Grove. Soon after his conversion, he felt called of God to the ministry. As much as he loved teaching, he gladly gave it up and immediately entered Vanderbilt University. To him, a call to preach was a call

to prepare for this responsibility. He completed the course and stood two examinations. Just at that time, he was called home on account of the death of a sister. Soon after this his father died, and left an aged mother for him to care for. These sad events made it impossible for him to return to the University for his diploma. Dr. S. B. Turrentine, N. M. Watson and G. F. Smith were among his classmates at the University. He always retained a very strong affection for them.

Brother Hix was licensed to preach in October 1884 by Rev. W. S. Black, D. D. He was ordained a deacon by Bishop R. K. Hargrove on December 1, 1889. The Annual Conference that year was held in Greensboro. He was ordained Elder by Bishop W. W. Duncan, December 10, 1893 in Wilmington, N. C.

Brother Hix was married to Miss Imogene Murdock of Randolph County, in October 1889. She was a young woman of culture and refinement, and in every way an ideal preacher's wife. To this union were born eight children. Several of these children have already graduated from Trinity College. All of the children are living except one son who died in 1915.

Brother Hix joined the Conference in Greensboro in 1889 and served the following charges: 1890-91, Goldsboro Circuit; 1692-93, Saint John's, Goldsboro; 1894, South Edgecombe Circuit; 1895-96, Henderson Station; 1897-08, Oen, Saint John and Gibson; 1900, Beaufort Station; 1901, Hertford Station; 1902-03-04, Mount Gilead Station.

During this last year his health became so impaired that he asked to be superannuated, and moved his family to Jackson Springs in Moore County where they spent the winter in order to be benefited by drinking the water. In the spring of 1905 he moved his family to Old Trinity in Randolph County. At the Conference in December he was appointed to Leasburg Circuit, but Bishop Wilson released him on account of sickness in the family. Soon after this vacancy occured on the North Thomasville Circuit. At the request of Rev. J. R. Scroggs, Presiding Elder, Brother Hix took charge of this work. He was transferred to the Western North Carolina Conference, and served in 1966-07 the North Thomasville Circuit. In

1908-09 the Mount Pleasant Circuit. In 1910 Lowell and Belmont. He was transferred back to the North Carolina Conference, and served in 1911 and 1912 the Goldston Circuit; in 1917, 18, 19 Wallace and Rose Hill; in 1920, 21 Southport Station. Brother Hix was superannuated at the Conference in 1921 and held that relationship until the time of his death. During the year 1917 while he was stationed at Wallace and Rose Hill his health began to fail. Symptoms became so alarming that the doctors advised him to stop and rest, but with a great love in his heart, he continued to work, not sparing himself, for four years longer. Even then he cherished the hope that after resting a while he might regain his health and come back into the active work, but that was not to be. He gradually grew weaker until the end came on the third day of December, 1923. At the time of his death his devoted wife and all the children were with him, except one son who was in Southern California trying to regain his health which he lost in the World War. The funeral service was held in the Memorial Church, conducted by Rev. H. E. Myers, Rev. M. Bradshaw, Rev. W. W. Peele and the writer. His tired, worn body was laid to rest in a beautiful spot in Maplewood Cemetery in Durham, N. C.

My acquaintance with Brother Hix began in 1897 at a session of the Rockingham District Conference, I was there applying for license to preach and also for recommendations on trial. Brother Hix was a member of the examining committee that licensed me to preach, that time he was pastor of the Saint John and Gibson charge. He took a deep personal interest in me, as he did in all young preachers. He invited me to visit in his home and assist him in revival work during the summer. I accepted his gracious invitation gladly, and we spent many happy days together. Almost my first preaching was done in his churches. His warm and generous heart gave me the confidence and encouragement that I so much needed. Our friendship that started then grew stronger with the passing years. It was in his home that I met Ethel Thompson, who a few years later became my wife. Brother Hix was a charming conversationalist. He had in him a fine element of ready wit and always enjoyed a

good joke. His laughter was vigorous and full of mirth. With fine scoial elements, he made friends wherever he went. He was blessed with a clear analytical mind that held great doctrines of the Bible. He preached the gospel of the Cross with passion and power. Sometimes he would rebuke sin with the rugged sternness of the old prophets, but the fire that burned in his soul gave his gospel a winsomness that was almost compelling. His was the evangelistic temperament and much of his preaching was of that type. Like Paul, he believed that the gospel of Jesus Christ was the power of God unto salvation unto everyone that believeth.

Brother Hix was a devoted husband and father, a loyal, true friend, generous in his estimation of his brethren, a pastor with the tender, loving Shepherd heart, a great lover of his church, a friend of men, a knightly soldier of the Cross, a preacher of gospel fervor and power. He walked the full length of the itinerant journey without any suspicion clouding his honored name. He wore the white plume of a blameless life until the last day.

I miss his comradeship, his love, and his prayers. He will meet no more with us in our councils and conferences, nor will he go forth with us to battle any more. When his name was called at this conference, there was no response. Another member of our noble brotherhood has been transferred to the Heavenly Conference, and I feel sure that he has been stationed somewhere in one of those mansions that Christ went to prepare; and it is well. It is God's way. It is the way we all are going, for here we have no continuing city. Friend, comrade, brother, good-night, until we meet in the morning of God's eternal day.

GEORGE THOMAS SIMMONS

In the going of Rev. George Thomas Simmons the North Carolina Conference lost one of its purest and most faithful servants.

Born in Sussex County, Virginia, January 15th, 1853 of Col. Thomas Spratley Simmons and Louisa Grizzard; reared in a Methodist home where the church and its doc-

trine filled an important place and where the love of country was demonstrated by valiant service and cheerful sacrifice in the time of Civil War; when his father died he was only ten years old, but he shared the deep sorrow with his mother and the five younger children; suffered the pains of poverty which came to so many thousands of Southern homes at the close of the War; lost his mother when he was only fourteen years old; along with the other children he was taken into the home of his uncle and guardian who lived at Halifax, North Carolina; plowed during the day and studied at night; are some of the experiences of early life related in his autobiography which was published in the North Carolina Christian Advocate April 17th of this year.

G. T. Simmons belonged to that long and noble list of heroic servants of Methodism who by reason of the influences in the country home and in the country church have been furnished a splendid basis for building lives of character and service. Surrounded by the elemental forces of nature and having a goodly heritage of simple faith and religious zeal upon which to make a start in life, he was ready at the age of twelve years to surrender himself to the Great Teacher and to accept membership in his church.

During those years between his conversion and his entrance into the North Carolina Conference he appeared to be dominated by a strong purpose to serve God and his fellows, and yet there was ever present the problem of meeting the essential human needs which one is likely to regard as a great handicap in the life of a young man. Such a situation though sometimes discouraging and distressing was to George Thomas Simmons as it has been to many another determined youth but a training school which prepared him to accept and to heroically follow a great call to serve humanity.

On the 18 of October, 1888, at the Quarterly Conference of the Henderson Charge over which Rev. F. L. Reid presided he was licensed to preach. In December of the same year he was admitted into the North Carolina Conference on trial, Bishop John C. Granberry presiding.

For thirty years he was a faithful circuit rider accept-

ing cheerfully his appointments wherever the Bishop bade him go. He appeared never to have been overconcerned about positions of honor but recognized the honor of service at any point in the great church to which he had given himself. His was preeminently a rural ministry To him and to the other faithful circuit riders of all the days of American Methodism the Church and the State owe an everlasting debt of gratitude. Service and not salary seemed to be the dominant desire of this Methodist preacher. All men have some elements of strength as well as those of weakness. The friends of G. T. Simmons always recognized in him an unquestioned character and a fidelity to duty which is remembered with much satisfaction. Whether at LaGrange, Cartaret, Elizabeth, Youngville, Millbrook, Elise, Candor, or Laurel Hill circuits, the same type of fidelity marked his ministry.

On the first day of May 1889 he was married to Miss Lillian Branson, daughter of Levi and Edith Branson, living at that time in Raleigh, North Carolina, and the sister of Dr. E. C. Branson, who is now professor of Rural Economics at the University of North Carolina. In this companion of his life he had a devoted and consecrated spirit who never waivered in her determination to assist her husband in the work of the Church.

On account of the failing health of both of these servants of God, Mr. Simmons asked for and was granted the superannuate relation at the 1919 session of the Annual The family moved to Richmond, Virginia, Conference. where they might be convenient to the Catawba Sanitorium in which both Rev. and Mrs. Simmons later became pa-For a time this suffering man performed such ministerial duties as opportunity afforded near Richmond and in the Sanitorium, but not many months passed until he and his wife were both so prostrated by the ravages of tuberculosis that neither could visit the other. They spent their final days in separation, one on the first floor and the other on the second floor of the Sanitorium, but always even to the end in the most cheerful and patient Christian attitudes. The writer had the privelage of reading some of the letters which both these patients wrote while thus suffering and saparated. It is our opinion that not in all our experience have we seen such splendid evidences of the power of the true Christian Faith to strengthen and keep sweet the spirits of men under such painful circumstances as they endured while they waited and watched the certain approach of the hand of death.

That figure which for many years was seen at the Annual Conference among the secretarial force where he performed the service of copying the records in his unusually legible handwriting may not again be seen on earth, but the influence of his pure life may still be felt by the hundreds of persons to whom he ministered, and especially that large number who, led by his life and gospel, committed themselves to christianity and to the Methodist Church.

WILLIAM PALMER CONSTABLE

William Palmer Constable was born in Hereford, England, in 1865. He came to America in 1873 and settled in Virginia near Lynchburg. He was educated in the schools of Virginia and New York. He was licensed to preach in 1896. He came to North Carolina and took charge of Henderson Mission as supply in 1901, and was admitted on trial in the North Carolina Conference and ordained Deacon in the Fall of the same year. He was admitted into full connection in 1903, and ordained Elder in 1905.

Brother Constable served the Church four years as a local preacher. After his admission on trial he served the following charges: Columbia Circuit, 1902-05; Saint Johns, Goldsboro, 1906-08; West Durham, 1909-10; Durham Circuit, 1911-14; Mattamuskeet Circuit, 1915-18; Spring Hope Circuit, 1919-22; Swan Quarter Circuit, 1923, and was returned to the same charge for another year but was too feeble to resume active work. Brother Constable was stricken critically ill during our Conference in Elizabeth City in 1923. He went from there to Watts Hospital in Durham, where he so far recovered his strength as to return to Swan Quarter. But his work was done. He was never able to preach again. His condition becoming more alarming, he went to the Washington Hospital and from

there back to Watts Hospital in Durham, where he passed to his everlasting reward February 26, 1924.

It is easy to follow this faithful servant of God and the Church as he went from place to place preaching the glad tidings, but it is impossible to estimate the worth of such a man to the Church and the State. Brother Constable was one of God's noblemen. I never had the privilege of association with a more prefect gentleman. He was not a man to win others by flattery. He was the soul of frankness and as free from affectation as any man I ever knew. His life was a constant rebuke to insincerity.

Brother Constable was a good preacher and a faithful and effective pastor. No man I ever knew more perfectly illustrated the spirit of unselfish service for others. Much of his life was spent on hard appointments, but he never seemed to grow discouraged or to think of himself. Conscious of his own salvation, satisfied of a Divine call to preach, he conferred not with flesh and blood, but gave himself unreservedly to the one business of his life. was the privilege of the writer to be intimately associated with him the last two years of his life on earth. I saw him in the home, in the house of worship, and rode by his side over the circuits. Let it be said as a tribute to the fine texture of his being that no unkind or unchaste word ever fell from his lips in my presence. He was as little concerned about his appointments as any man of my acquaintance. He did not desire to select his own place of service. He declined to express a preference. He believed in God and in the loyalty of his brethren, and he trusted both. His greatest cross fell on him when he could no longer serve. He wanted to preach and work for his Master's glory. Finding that he must yield to the inevitable, his resignation was beautiful. The writer was much in his company while he lingered in the shadows. Not once did he complain. He simply waited for the call from his Master. His house was in order; he was ready to go. He has entered into the "rest which remains to the people of God." There remain to mourn his passing his faithful wife; two sons, Palmer N. and Ernest W., and two daughters, Mrs. W. W. Watson, and Miss Edna E. Constable. May the grace of our Lord Jesus sustain them! We miss his kindly greeting and his warm hand grasp. He waits beyond the river for the coming of his comrades and his loved ones. May our own gracious Father sustain us till our course is finished and we join him and the others of the glorified host!

MRS. G. T. SIMMONS By J. A. Hornaday

Mrs. Lillian Branson Simmons, a daughter of Dr. Levi and Mrs. Edith Cunninggim Branson, of Raleigh, N. C., was born April 2, 1866, and passed in great peace to her home above September 4, 1924, in the 59th year of her age.

In 1889 she was united in marriage with Rev. George T. Simmons of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and for thirty years she walked by the side of her husband as he went from one charge to another, always with a smiling face and a singing heart, although many of the charges served by her husband were not classed as "desirable charges."

In March of last year Brother Simmons in a letter to me had this to say about his wife: "During my first year in the ministry one of the best girls that ever lived left one of the happiest homes in North Carolina, and a good position, to become my wife. And from the mountains to the seaboard she gladly zigzagged with me from charge to charge for more than thirty years, and now that she is an invalid in a sanitorium, and I am not able to provide for her as I wish, I am up against the saddest proposition of my seventy years of this life."

Brother Gibbons died in 1885. Then Sister Gibbons moved to Jonesboro, bought a little home and began the great task of rearing the family of children. And by industry, economy and frugality with and abiding faith in God, she succeeded well.

She received only a small pittance from the Conference each year; yet she gave all the children the advantage and opportunity of a college education.

The Mother instinct was so definite and powerful in her that each child was a gift from God committed to her to be nurtured for his Glory. She lived not for herself, but for others.
