APPENDIX

REPORT NO. 1 OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF MISSIONS

The Board of Missions has had under consideration the general missionary situation in the Church, and especially our responsibility in the annual missionary cultivation campaign conducted in accordance with the provisions of the discipline. We rejoice in the success of the campaign last year. Its educational and spiritual aspects were eminently successful and the free will offering was liberal. Already \$690,000.00 in cash has been received and when all the Annual Conferences have met and final reports are made it is expected that the offering will total \$750,000.00. While below the objective set by the General Conference, it has enabled us to conduct our work through the year without deficit or retrenchment, although we have not been able to make advances.

In our own Conference the amount raised was \$37,500.00 on our asking of \$60,000.00. While this is less than we had hoped for, it represents a substantial gain over last year. We would heartily commend the Missionary Secretaries, Presiding Elders, pastors, and the laymen, who rendered unstinted co-operation in the campaign. The educational work accomplished and the interest manifested convice us that our Conference is missionary at heart, and that we will be more successful in the future.

The most notable feature in our present missionary program is a world-wide campaign of evangelism. "The very small increase in membership for the past year in our connection is a matter of grave concern," said the General Secretary in his report to the General Board. The revival fires should be rekindled throughout Methodism. Especially in our foreign fields should we plan for definite and sustained effort in preaching the word to the hungry multitudes. We are well equipped with schools and hospitals and other buildings in most of our fields. We need now to lay emphasis upon extending the borders of the Church. The spiritually hungry masses are waiting on us everywhere. We endorse this program and pledge ourselves to its support. To finance the program your Board of Missions has placed in its budget an unappropriated item of \$150,000; \$100,000 to be expended abroad and \$50,000 to be expended at home. This money will be expended if secured above the sums necessary for maintaining our work in the field. This means practically, that if the free will offering in the Church in January and February of next year is \$150,000 more than it was last year, this evangelistic advance will be; otherwise, it must wait on the response of the Church.

We are resolved, therefore,

First: To commend and endorse the policy of world-wide evangelism. Second: To enter heartily into all the educational and spiritual phases of the missionary cultivation campaign in January and February. Third: To set as our goal the sum of \$60,000, this to be raised as a free will offering.

Your Board makes the following recommendations:

First: That the Presiding Elders hold their missionary institutes, as provided in the Discipline, immediately following the mid-year meeting of the Board of Missions, to be held January 3rd, 1928.

Second: That Rev. F. S. Love be appointed Conference Missionary

Secretary.

BOARD OF MISSIONS-REPORT NO. 2

The Board of Missions seems ever faced with the necessity of denying requests that represent urgent need. We are glad, however, that through the Duke Fund and slightly increased collections we are able to make a small increase in appropriations. The splendid work of our pastors has lessened the demand at some places and made possible appropriations at places where the need was urgent and distinctive. From many of these charges aided by the Board of Missions have come our best reports on members received on profession of faith. Presiding Elders and pastors have been conservative in their asking and any failure to comply was dictated by lack of funds.

We recommend to our pastors the program of the department of Education and promotion for education in missions by increasing the circulation of the *Missionary Voice*, and urge co-operation with the Woman's Missionary Society in promoting this endeavor.

The Board of Missions hears with pleasure the report of the splendid work which has been done by Payne College and would commend to our Churches and people any appeal which shall be made to provide additional buildings.

We ask that you elect W. A. Cade, G. W. Perry, W. V. McRae, C. S. Wallace and W. L. Knight as a Committee on Evangelism.

BOARD OF EDUCATION—REPORT NO. 1 CHARTER OF LOUISBURG COLLEGE

For the purpose of eliminating any possible necessity of the Conference Trustees joining in the execution of any such deed of trust or instrument which act might by possibility be construed as obligating the Conference for the payment of any debts so incurred, and for the purpose of vesting the title to all of the property of said Conference in the Trustees thereof or in the corporation as such, but at the same time preserving all of the rights, powers and privileges of the Conference as otherwise provided in said original charter, be it resolved:

That the Trustees of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, be, and they are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to convey to Louisburg Female College, a body corporate, or to the duly elected and qualified Trustees of said College, all the property and title vested in said North Carolina Conference by virtue of Section 7 of the original charter of said Louisburg Female College. Provided, however, that nothing herein or in said conveyance hereby authorized shall in any wise impair or diminish any right, power or privilege of said Conference in the control and management of the real property of said Louisburg Female College as otherwise provided in said original charter, and provided further, that in any deed executed by the Trustees of said Conference pursuant to this resolution, a copy of this resolution shall be set out in full as evidence of the authority of said Trustees in the premises.

BOARD OF EDUCATION-REPORT NO. 2

Board of Education desires to present the following resolution:

WHEREAS, Carolina College has heretofore been operated under the control and supervision of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, WHEREAS, said Carolina College ceased to operate in the spring of 1926 and because of its financial condition has been placed in receivership by the Courts of North Carolina, WHEREAS, this Conference is not inclined to undertake further operations of the College and WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Conference and all other interested parties that the buildings and equipment be disposed of in such a manner as to liquidate the indebtedness of the Institution and, if possible, to have said property utilized further for same worthy purpose:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the North Carolina Annual Conference in session in Raleigh, North Carolina, on this 12th day of November, 1927, that the Board of Trustees of said Carolina College, acting in its name by its President and Secretary, or through and by any other appropriate and lawful agency, be authorized and empowered to convey all the right, title and interest which this Conference owns in and to the assets of said Carolina College, both personal property and real estate, to any person, firm, corporation or organization, deemed proper to own and operate said properties, upon condition that the grantee pay all of the debts and obligations of said Carolina College together with all the costs and expenses incurred in connection with the legal proceedings now pending or subsequently instituted in connection with said Carolina College.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any and all funds received for the aforesaid properties in excess of the debts, obligations and expenses, referred to herein above, if there be any such excess, be paid to the North Carolina Annual Conference to be used for educational purposes.

BOARD OF EDUCATION—REPORT NO. 3

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION MOVEMENT

In order to close out the campaign of the Christian Education Movement in our Conference, we recommend that one month during the next year be selected for this purpose; the time selected in order to avoid conflict with any other campaign. The plans of the General Board for this purpose shall be followed.

It is urged that Christian Education Day be observed on the second

or third Sunday in June in all the charges of the Conference.

For the purpose of aiding worthy young people in preparing for definite Christian service and missionary work in our Church institution it is urged that a sustentation fund be placed in the hands of this Board. Our pastors and Presiding Elders are urged to give special attention to this matter.

DUKE UNIVERSITY

The rise and development of Duke University to a place in the field of education second to none is a source of rejoicing to us all. We recognize that this is due largely to the provision made by Mr. James B. Duke and the efforts of the authorities of the institution. We pledge ourselves to the continued support of this university. We note with sorrow Mr. Joseph G. Brown's death, which occurred this year. Mr. Brown for ten years was President of the Board of Trustees, and through his life gave devoted service to his church and his fellowman. Fitting tribute has been paid to his memory during this Conference.

The building program on the old campus is nearly completed, giving twelve new buildings which with the present campus will be soon used as a co-ordinate college for women. Work has already begun on the new campus and it is expected that the buildings of the Greater Duke

will be completed within three years.

We rejoice in the development in the organization in its various departments. The graduate school is attracting students from all over the world. The student life division is specially to be commended. Sympathy, patience and general encouragement should be given the leaders in this great program.

The number of students for the academic year of 1926-27 is 1,593. The number of students in the summer school in the year of 1926-

1927 was 1,395.

The number of officers and teachers, 110.

Plant, equipment and unexpended building funds, \$20,786,412.96. Endowment, \$20,486,610.00.

GREENSBORO COLLEGE

We rejoice in all the progress and the splendid report from Greensboro College. The number of teachers is 27. Students, 393, with crowded

conditions. The property value is \$700,570, with endowment amounting to \$337,750. Excellent improvements have been made in the material equipment, the College now being a member of The Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools of the Southern States. Attention is called to the endorsement last year of the effort to raise \$500,000. We approve the continuation of this effort.

LOUISBURG COLLEGE

The development of Louisburg College is gratifying due to the liberality of friends of the College, the energy of the present administration and the growing demand for an institution of this kind. It is the purpose to continue plans for the best possible Junior College for girls.

The number of students is nearly 300, with several turned away. The faculty numbers more than 20. The value of equipment and loan funds is \$485,137.74. It is recommended that the Trustees of Louisburg College be given permission to issue \$125,000 in bonds for the purpose of funding the existing bonded indebtedness; to pay outstanding building obligations and complete the central heating system. We also hear with interest and approval the plans for the enlargement and equipment of the Institution.

Concerning the Appropriation to Carolina College

If, after the liquidation of the assets of Carolina College as ordered by the Conference, there shall remain a balance of the present indebtedness still unpaid, this appropriation shall be applied to same; provided, that any balance of the appropriation remaining after all debts shall have been paid shall be held by the Treasurer of the Board of Education to be used for educational purposes for causes within the Conference as the Board of Education shall direct.

Realizing the growing need for great educational advantages and equipment for our people and rejoicing in the development along these lines, it is the sincere opinion of this board that the educational institutions under the supervision of this Conference do not incur indebtedness

beyond the sight of immediate possible payment and that this Board cannot endorse plans for the liquidation of any indebtedness incurred without first having the approval of this Conference board.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

Your Sunday School Board submits the following report:

The Sunday school program of the Conference is in a healthy state of development. During the year progress has been made in the appreciation and promotion of the work of religious education in the Church.

Special emphasis has been given to recruiting and enlarging Sunday school enrollment, to missionary education and extension, and to evangelism in the Sunday school. While this has been done, other well established features of our program have been carried forward, including teacher training, program of work promotion, building and equipment, and so forth.

During the year 52 training schools were conducted, serving 405 Sunday schools—over 56% of the schools of the Conference. Enrolled in training schools, classes, and correspondence courses were approximately 5,000 persons. A total of 3,562 training awards were issued, by far the largest number in the history of training work in the Conference.

Programs of work have been placed, to date, in 409 schools, the majority of which were given special attention in the annual check-up campaign, which revealed 47 ranking schools.

Through institutes, conferences, and various other meetings, our staff, both employed and volunteer, have made helpful contacts with workers throughout the Conference, between whom there seems to be a fine spirit of comradeship and co-operation.

The Board's finances are in good condition. We have expanded our scope of service and have, by strict economy, kept within our income. Although slightly more money is passing through our hands each year, we are able to show more than a corresponding increase in the amount of work done and service rendered. We anticipate increasing demand for expanding program. Even so, there seems to be no immediate necessity for an increased assessment. This estimate, however, is based upon the assumption that Sunday School Day offerings shall be properly directed and that our Dual Extension program shall soon become self-sustaining.

WE RECOMMEND

- That we continue promotion of Sunday school and allied work in religious education in keeping with the policies of the General Sunday School Board.
- 2. That, for purposes suggested in the foregoing resolution, we recommend the organization in each District of a District Sunday School Council, to meet as soon after Annual Conference as practicable, and to be constituted as follows: Presiding Elder, resident members of Sunday School Board, District Sunday school officers, and not more than three other persons to be elected by the District Conference. (Presiding Elder to appoint for this year).

- 3. That said District Councils be authorized to set up District goals and to name District officers to aid in attaining the goals adopted.
- 4. That we accept with thanks the invitation to hold our fifth annual Conference-wide Conference at Hay Street Church, Fayetteville, March 28-30, 1928.
- 5. That Rev. W. C. Martin, Prof. R. N. Wilson and Rev. J. H. Lanning be re-elected members of the Board of Managers of the Pastor's School.

We are happy to report the re-election of Mr. L. L. Gobbel as Conference Superintendent of Sunday School Work, at \$3,500.00 per annum; of Miss Georgia S. Keene, as Elementary Superintendent, at \$2,000.00 per annum; and we recommend the appointment of Rev. J. O. Long as Extension Secretary, at \$3,000.00 per annum. Each with traveling expenses.

These workers have rendered faithful and untiring service to the Church and we bespeak for them the continued prayers and co-operation which they and the cause they represent so richly deserve.

In view of adverse criticism caused by auto travel allowance of 8c per mile, the Board has adopted the policy of furnishing cars to its Superintendent and Extension Secretary.

REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD

Your Epworth League Board submits the following report:

During the past conference year all phases of the Epworth League work have shown substantial progress. The League idea is steadily growing in the minds of our people, both pastors and laymen.

When the returns were all in from the Louisburg Assembly, it was found that the 1927 gathering was the most successful of any that have been held. Twenty-seven pastors were in attendance; 273 Christian Culture Certificates and eleven Christian Culture Diplomas were awarded; much inspiration was taken home to the local chapters and used.

The Epworth League Board wishes to express its deep appreciation to the Duke University School of Religion and the Duke Commission for co-operation in young people's work in the North Carolina Conference. The League work has already been greatly strengthened by the consecrated young ministers sent out to various fields of work during the summer months; and the Board wishes to express its desire to co-operate

with the Duke School of Religion in every way possible to further the interests of the Kingdom within the bounds of our Conference.

We are eager that more pastors and laymen learn the League work and appreciate its worth. We recommend, therefore, that, since our Church looks to the Epworth League to develop our young people in Christian leadership, that an Epworth League course for pastors, district secretaries, and other League workers be offered in the Duke Pastors' School next summer.

We recommend further that, in co-operation with the Duke interest in rural Church extension, that the President of the Conference Epworth League and the Chairman of the Epworth League Board be added to the Council of Rural Agencies created by the North Carolina and the Western North Carolina Conferences in 1925, for the purpose of placing graduate students in the field during the vacation period, working with the pastors and district secretaries in promoting young people's revivals and offering courses in leadership training.

We recommend that all League officers be publicly installed, and that every effort be put forth to the end that the League may render the greatest possible service in developing Christian character and the ideal, "All for Christ."

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

Having had access to the annual statement by the agents of the Publishing House, M. E. Church, South, to our Conference, we have found several things of real interest to the whole Church.

The statement is for the fiscal year ending February 28, 1927, and meets the provision of the Discipline.

- 1. The total sales of more than two million dollars for the past year show a net operating profit of \$118,391.70, which represents a decrease of \$5,660.91, accounted for by a loss in sales of our Sunday school literature of \$28,000, because of decreasing Sunday school membership.
- 2. The increase in the circulation of the *Christian Advocate* of 1,125 is pleasing, and it is claimed that a paid subscription list of 30,000 would make this excellent publication self-sustaining; we, therefore, heartily commend it, earnestly declarning our conviction that it is worthy to attain such a goal.
- 3. We rejoice that our enterprising Publishing Agents, with our wise Book Committee's approval, have recently established a Department of Tracts, doctrinal and evangelistic, free tracts, to be supplied our pastors and churches. During the first six months of the operation of this department of Christian Literature, nearly 150,000 tracts were distributed,

and very many letters of commendation were received, convincing our agents of the great need of such service as this new department can render.

- 4. It is gratifying to be assured that our Publishing House has never been in better financial condition, the present report showing increasing assets and decreasing liabilities, and a creditable appropriation of \$60,000 for the Conference claimants, and sanguinely setting forth the hope of maintaining this annual distribution throughout the quadrennium.
- 5. According to the financial statement presented, all accounts and records have been duly examined and audited, and have been pronounced in prime and prosperous condition. Our good agents manifest a spirit of humble gratitude for this wonderful prosperity, and state that it is largely due to loyalty and support given by ministers and laymen.

In consideration of all these interesting facts and conditions, we urge the devotion of more time to the distribution of Christian literature, not only that the financial increase may be greater, but also that there may be a more spiritual membership in all our great Church.

Plyler as Business Manager and Assistant Editor, we recommend his appointment to this joint relation, and unanimously favor the proposed enlargement of the paper to thirty-two pages, and with no increase in the subscription price, and we urge general co-operation in systematic plans through certain agencies of the Church to collect all unpaid subscriptions, and to secure an unprecedentedly large number of new subscribers in both Conferences.

The salary to be paid Rev. M. T. Plyler is \$5,000, including \$1,000 for house rent.

The enlargement of the paper necessitates the discontinuance of all commissions, though the amount for Conference claimants, \$390, is paid each year. This enlargement is to be worked out by Editor, Business Manager, and the Executive Committee from The Methodist Board of Publication, and we trust that it may be satisfactory, and that it may mean great good to every cause of the Church at large.

We believe that Rev. T. A. Sikes, the retiring Business Manager, has done efficient work during his seven years of service, the Job Department having shown a gain of \$3,627.38 during 1927, and only this once has there been loss in the totals of the entire business. We regret his retirement, and assure him of our sincere appreciation of his efficiency. At the same time we warmly welcome Rev. M. T. Plyler as his successor, and confidently bespeak for him the most liberal support by both the ministry and the laity. As the assets are \$182,071.44, it can readily be seen that the business of the North Carolina Christian Advocate is in a satisfactorily sound and safe condition.

Dr. W. P. Few's term of service as a member of The Methodist Board of Publication having expired, we advise that he be re-elected for the usual term, five years.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

From its earliest days the Methodist Church has waged warfare upon the use, the making and the selling of intoxicants. They regarded drink as the foe of the home, of the Church, of religion. Then, as now, it was known to be true that the drink habit is the fruitful mother of poverty, of irreligion, of crime. The necessity for teaching the effects of alcohol on the human system calls for a re-enactment of the lapsed law for such instruction. For a century, crusading for the destruction of the liquor traffic, our Church in 1919 rejoiced with other creeds and temperance workers that the Eighteenth Amendment made illegal the sale and manufacture of intoxicants of every character. That forward step was hailed by temperance advocates as the goal of redemption from the liquor evil.

The advocates of prohibition expected all law-abiding people to obey and respect the new law and uphold the addition to the Constitution. They felt no fear of nullification. Today, while gratified that, under prohibition, drinking and drunkenness have decreased, they have observed with apprehension a recent reversion to lawlessness and disregard of the Constitution. These bode no good to our country. Disregard of one law leads to contempt for all laws. Therefore we declare it to be our conviction that the overshadowing moral question in America today is one of upholding the majesty of the law and we call upon all the people to rally to the support of all officials who are seeking to enforce the laws of our land. We call upon those charged with public duty, and upon all who may be called to serve in local, state and national administrations to give the same diligence to the carrying out of the prohibition law as is given to other statutes.

Demanding, as citizens devoted to the welfare of our country, better law enforcement, we call upon all people as individuals to refrain from the use of intoxicants, thereby hastening the day when intoxicating drink will no longer weave chains of an injurious habit or tempt the weak or vicious to make merchandise of what the law forbids to be made or vended.

REPORT OF BOARD OF FINANCE

Your Board of Finance submits the following:

We are now closing the fourth year of our Special Effort for the Superannuate Endowment. You have been apprised of the plan of the General Board of Finance, calling for unusual endeavor in behalf of this cause during the fifth year of the movement, therefore as your representatives to give zealous care for the needs of claimants of this Conference and as an affiliate body of the General Board, we most earnestly urge that our Conference join persistently in the plan projected. On a quota of \$432,468.92 we have paid only \$114,534.42. Only one charge has paid its quota in full. One hundred thirty-six charges have paid more than \$100. Fifty-six have paid less than \$100, and twelve charges have paid nothing. Our Conference must no longer lag in doing its part for this neglected cause. Let us pay every penny that we have promised. To this end, we entreat every pastor to join heartily in the plan projected by the General Board for application during March, April and May, 1928. As your Conference Board of Finance, we commit ourselves unreservedly to this work and beseech all the members of our Conference to join us in a united effort to do our part well. We request the Bishop to appoint Rev. J. M. Daniel Conference Director of Superannuate Endowment.

On the first day of the meeting of the Annual Conference, before figuring any percentages, the Conference Treasurer is directed to pay to the Treasurer of the local church, where the Conference is held, the sum of \$3,500 for Conference expense; he is also directed to pay to the Conference Secretary \$1,500 to cover his salary, incidental expenses and the printing of the Journal; to the Statistical Secretary \$200; and to the Conference Treasurer \$300 to cover their salaries.

Your Commission recommends that out of all the amounts collected from the grand total of \$228,670 the distribution shall be made by the Conference Treasurer on the following basis: 60.82 per cent to the Conference work and 39.18 per cent to the General Conference work.

On motion in the regular meeting a year ago it was ordered that the books of the Conference Treasurer be audited. The books were audited during the year by W. F. Dixon, Certified Public Accountant of Raleigh, N. C. The report of the Auditor is entered upon the records of the Commission.

It was ordered by unanimous vote that the Secretary of the Commission on Budget shall make the apportionments to the various Districts on the basis of assessments to the support of the ministry rather than on the amounts paid.

ORPHANAGE REPORT

We, your Orphanage Committee, beg leave to submit the following report:

The number of children taken care of by the Orphanage during the Conference year now ending was 257.

We note with pleasure that the Orphanage school has been put on the accredited list by the State Board of Education this school year, thus making it possible for those who graduate from this school to enter any of the colleges in the state without examination. The school has a corps of highly trained teachers who are obtaining very gratifying results in their school work. At the last meeting of the Board of Trustees it was decided to add a Business Course to the high school, which has been done, thus giving a splendid business department.

In the way of improvements during the year a large barn has been built, all the outside wood work of the cottages has been painted, and several of them have been painted on the inside. Also, the library has been furnished with shelves and tables, and the school auditorium seated through the generosity of Woman's Missionary and Aid Societies of the Conference. The business department has also been furnished with all necessary equipment, as well as some of the class rooms. Two new buildings are under construction, namely, a Baby Cottage, and a home for the Superintendent. Since the present home of the Superintendent is so large, it was deemed wise to build him a new home and turn the old home into a cottage that would take care of about thirty children, thus saving a great cost in building.

Through the kindness of Mr. G. C. Trice and Rev. J. H. Shore, of Hay Street Church, Fayetteville, the Orphanage is in possession of a splendid bus to convey their Singing Class from Church to Church. By reason of this fact the \$4,400.00 bus only cost the Orphanage \$1,900.00, which was a saving of \$2,500.00.

The Singing Classes visited a great many of the rural Churches and a few of the town Churches during the summer where large and enthusiastic congregations received them most cordially. The free will offerings given these classes have met all the additional expense of the purchase price of the bus and the operation of both cars. It is the purpose of the Singing Classes to visit as many of the rural and small town Churches as possible. Within the next few years they hope to reach every Church in the North Carolina Conference. We recommend that free will offerings be taken at each Church where sacred concerts are given, provided the pastor does not think it inexpedient to do so.

It is gratifying to note that evangelistic services were held in the chapel by Rev. E. L. Hillman, at the Orphanage, in the early spring which greatly revived the spiritual life of the officers and children. All those who were not Christians at that time made a profession of faith.

The total expenditures for the year was \$84,000.00. The amount of the ten percent assessment on the Churches last year was \$42,701.70 Of this amount only \$35,962.39 was paid. By comparing the amount raised from assessment with the expenditures, it will be seen that they had to raise through specials and other sources \$48,037.61. In addition to that, the Board of Trustees are planning to add one hundred more children to the present number, which will make three hundred and fifty to three hundred and sixty, which will largely increase the total expenditures for the coming year. In view of those facts, it is imperative that all pastors, Churches, Sunday schools, and organized classes, present the claims of the Orphanage during the Thanksgiving season, and make just as liberal response in specials as possible. Thanksgiving envelopes are being furnished pastors and superintendents for the taking of this offering. We recommend that a Thanksgiving offering be taken in each Church in the Conference during the period between the adjournment of the Annual Conference and Christmas. We further recommend that the Sunday school and organized classes contribute to the Orphanage throughout the year.

In order to answer the pressure from every source for new buildings, and to take care of the one hundred or more children which will be added to the present number, the Board of Trustees have voted to raise \$100,000 immediately following Conference. We wish to endorse this movement of the Board of Trustees, and to call upon the pastors and all Church Official Boards to give this undertaking the right-of-way during the next six weeks.

We recommend that the ten percent assessment be continued on the basis of the pastors' salaries for the year now ending.

We would like to emphasize the importance of our people writing the Orphanage in their wills. We further recommend that elderly people with means take advantage of the Methodist Orphanage Annuity Bonds which pay from six to seven per cent on all money turned over to them according to age of annuitants.

We recommend that Rev. A. S. Barnes be appointed Superintendent of the Orphanage with a salary of \$4,000.00 fixed by the Board of Trustees.

REPORT OF BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The General Conference has directed the work of our Board along four main lines; the promotion of full payment of the Benevolent Claims, Christian Stewardship, Men's Work through the Wesley Brotherhood, and Co-operation with the other agencies of the Church.

We are glad to report progress and to call particular attention to the

following features in our work for this Conference year.

In view of the responsibility placed upon the Board of Lay Activities together with the Bishop, Presiding Elders, and pastors for the promotion of full payment of the Benevolent Claims, be it resolved:

1. That the assessments, general and Conference, constitute our first and abiding obligation.

That the Benevolences be provided for in cash and pledges as soon as practicable after the session of the Annual Conference.

3. That at least half of these claims should be paid by the time of the District Conference.

4. That the Board of Lay Activities unite with the Bishop, Presiding Elders, pastors and other Boards of the Conference in a co-operative effort to inform our entire membership of the needs represented in our Benevolent Claims, and to promote systematic, proportional and sacrificial giving to the great causes represented in assessments, setting as our goal

100 percent payment on all claims for this Conference year.

To this end a Commission on Benevolences composed of the Commission on Budget and the Chairmen of all the Conference Boards, has been organized as an Advisory Council to the Conference Board of Lay Activities, to co-operate with this Board in promoting full payment of the Benevolences. That this Council shall meet with the Bishop, his Cabinet, and the laymen in this annual meeting for this Conference. The officers of the Council are Rev. Daniel Lane, of the Epworth League Board, and Mr. B. I. Satterfield, of the Board of Lay Activities. The officers are to serve until the time of the meeting which the Bishop shall have with the Elders and Lay Leaders. At that time permanent officers of this Council shall be elected for the year.

5. That the Presiding Elders be asked to urge that the best men possi-

ble be chosen as District and Associate Lay Leaders.

If our people are ever to realize the blessing of adequate giving, it will be necessary to cultivate the principles of Christian Stewardship, by practicing it on the part of the Elders, pastors and the laymen. For the purpose of promoting Christ's Kingdom among men through fellowship, prayer, Christian testimony, personal work, and aggressive evangelistic effort, we commend the Wesley Brotherhood and urge its organization in every Church practicable.

We urge that a special effort be made on the part of the lay leaders to put the "Methodist Layman" in the hands of every charge leader and as

many of the laymen possible in every charge.

We obligate to underwrite the expense of putting the Methodist Layman into the hands of all the Elders and active preachers of the Conference.

We recommend that the Board of Managers of the Duke Pastors' School be asked to provide instruction on the work of Lay Activities and Stewardship and that as many laymen as possible be urged to take the courses.

We nominate and recommend the election of Dr. W. P. Few as Conference Lay Leader.

REPORT OF JOINT COMMISSION

The Joint Commission of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Protestant Church, in North Carolina, submits the following report:

1. In order to promote fellowship and bring mutual benefit to the two Churches, we would reiterate the recommendations set forth in the four items in our report made two years ago, and repeated in our report one year ago, namely, that there may be, as opportunity affords, and interchange of pulpits by ministers of the two branches of Methodism and an interchange of preachers in revival work.

Also that continuous effort be made for readjustment where the two Churches overlap in rural districts, and to avoid crowding or overlapping where new preaching places are being established in towns and cities, and that the Presiding Elder involved and the President of the Methodist Protestant Conference, together with the Committee on Rural Church Problems, constitute a Board of Mediation to act with the parties interested in making the adjustment.

- 2. It was agreed to continue the Committee created one year ago, composed of Dr. W. P. Few and Revs. A. G. Dixon, M. T. Plyler and R. C. Stubbins, to study the problem of co-operation and readjustment of rural Church work in territory where the two Churches overlap, this Committee to report to the next annual meeting of the Joint Commission, making recommendation as to the basis of operation. This Committee is to be known as the Committee on Rural Church Problems.
- 3. Following the agreement of a year ago, that the term of office of two members of the Joint Commission, representing each of the two

denominations, should expire each year, Rev. M. T. Plyler and Rev. J. H. Barnhardt were nominated by the group of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, for election by their Conferences, respectively, the North Carolina Conference and the Western North Carolina Conference. The matter of electing two members by the Methodist Protestant Conference was referred to the Nominating Committee of that Conference.

REPORT OF THE DUKE FUND COMMISSION

Each year with enlarged experience and a better view of the entire situation, the distribution of the Duke Fund becomes easier and, we trust, more satisfactory. Though much remains to be done before entire satisfaction can be gained.

In addition to the \$5,000 distributed by the Board of Missions of each Conference every year and the larger amounts distributed directly by The Duke Endowment to aid the preachers who work in the country, a number of young preachers of Duke University are assigned to work in country pastorates. Last summer seven young men assisted pastors through the summer vacation. This venture proved to be a fine success. The plan is to place a larger number next summer.

We would suggest that any pastor who expects to have a helper next summer should begin to make preparation for this soon after Conference:

1. Lay out a special program for the summer.

2. Advise the office at Duke so that the number needed may be secured

Indicate the special kind of work to be stressed that men with special talents for that kind of work may be assigned.

This will guarantee that something special is doing in the charge and it will also let the young men know what to plan for.

The effort to aid in building churches by securing plans and advising in the undertaking is making some headway, but there is still need for fuller co-operation between local committees and the office at Durham. A joint effort of patient planning and careful co-operation in building would save the embarrassment of heavy debts and the failure to get moneyl to carry out certain plans, too often ill suited to the situation.

Professor Ormond does the best he can with the many demands upon him. Few realize how difficult it is to care for all the details and the patience required in this work. To use money without waste in building Churches is difficult, but it is more difficult to use money to the best advantage to aid the preachers who work in the country. The personal equation plays a larger part. The men charged with administering this trust should have the fullest co-operation of every member of the Conference, the utnost patience possible.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT

With thirteen years of experience in administering the James B. Duke Rural Church Fund, certain general principles have been evolved, and a copy of these is herewith attached.

The Rural Church-Some General Principles

In making recommendations of appropriations or loans from The Duke Endowment for the building of church houses, the following definite aims are kept in view:

- 1. To meet the needs, present and prospective, of the congregations to be served.
- 2. To encourage the building of churches that will be examples for others to follow. Usually aid will not be given to church houses that are below the C type; that is, houses that provide for at least three rooms in addition to the church auditorium; and plans are to be approved beforehand.
- 3. To encourage the building of permanent church houses. Stone or brick should be used if possible.
- 4. To be sure of a good site and to have plenty of land. If in the open country there should be five to ten acres.
- 5. To make sure of a strategic location; that is, in communities that are apt to grow or at points where another church or other churches might now or later be consolidated.
- 6. To make amounts appropriated larger or smaller according as a given church meets conditions outlined above, depending in part also upon the present congregation's financial ability, and only after careful study and personal inspection.

Only small amounts will ordinarily be recommended unless all or most of the above conditions are met. Churches falling below these standards will usually belong to one of two classes:

- 1. Weak and struggling churches that must consolidate with other church or churches, or cease to exist. Money invested in these church houses will have a temporary, not a permanent use.
- 2. Weak churches that are new and have a future, or weak churches that have a new opportunity because of changed economic conditions in the communities where they are located. These churches will be favorably considered for appropriations especially as they come into position to undertake permanent church building. When necessary this building may be done in permanent units that will ultimately fit into a completed whole.

In making recommendations of appropriations for the maintenance of country churches, much the same general considerations as in the case of church building but specifically these two aims are kept in view:

1. To give aid to such country churches and circuits as seem most to need and most to deserve aid.

2. To seek to stimulate and improve the quality of work done by supplementing salaries in representative country churches and circuits and thus making it possible for first-class men to look forward to country appointments that will be as good in every way as town appointments. This will involve the development of men who have been fitted for this sort of work, the encouragement of them to stay in it, and the helping of them to realize that they may have as good chances in the country as anywhere else to succeed and to be useful. Other things being equal preference will be given to churches whose houses have been built in co-operation with this rural church fund.

Your Commission on Church Building at Chapel Hill submits the following report:

The work committed to our hands to build an adequate Methodist Church at Chapel Hill for the Methodist students attending the University of North Carolina, has been completed. The pews, carpet and pulpit furniture have been placed this year. The building is proving itself to be well appointed and located as a social and religious center at Chapel Hill, and its usage warrants the labor and the cost of its construction. It stands as a challenge to the ideals and the aspirations of hundreds of youths who pass its portals daily.

The financial statement attached herewith shows a total expenditure of \$230,964.97, with an indebtedness of \$68,647.81. To meet this indebtedness and provide a small maintenance fund, your Commission makes the following recommendations:

1. That this Commission be continued as constituted.

2. That the two co-operating Methodist Conferences in North Caroline, each create a Special Conference Mission Fund for the purpose of paying this indebtedness.

3. That the amount of this fund for each Conference for the year 1927-1928 be \$12,000.

4. That a Committee be named to plan the ways and means of securing this Special Conference Mission Fund.

REPORT OF THE GENERAL AGENT OF THE METHODIST MUTUAL FIRE INSURANCE COMPANY OF GREENSBORO, N. C., TO THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS AT MEET-ING HELD IN ASHEVILLE, N. C., NOV. 3, 1927

H. M. NORTH, Treasurer.

During the month of March the general office of The Methodist Mutual Fire Insurance Company was moved to Greensboro and the undersigned placed in charge as General Agent. At that time the Company showed total assets of \$6,860.80 and liabilities of \$8,882.94, making a net deficit of \$2.022.14.

Statement of operations of the Company for the nine months period ended September, 1927, is attached hereto and made a part of this report. Statement of assets and liabilities is also attached, showing that the deficit as of September 30th, 1927, is \$1,851.40 as compared with \$2,022.14 when the management was changed.

The attached statements are further supplemented by the following information which is taken from our books as of September 30th, 1927:

The above tabulation includes both one and three year business and represents the amount at risk as of date given.

While the Company has shown but slight growth during the present year, there has nevertheless been a steady accretion to surplus. Practically no business has been allowed to lapse and each month new policyholders have been added to our Register. Premium income from new business since change of management has been in the neighborhood of \$1,000. At this writing we are receiving an average of four inquiries from prospects each week and a majority of these are resulting in new business. These inquiries have obviously been in reply to our advertising in the Advocate or to our direct mail advertising. The latter method has been pursued somewhat diligently and a strenuous effort has been made to enlist the co-operation of all Elders in the support of our Company. Numerous circulars have been mailed to pastors throughout the jurisdiction of the two Conferences presenting the cause of our Company. Our latest bulletin to policyholders and prospects, presenting the cause of fire prevention, is attached hereto and made a part of this report.

While there has been gradual growth it would appear that this growth has not been sufficient to strengthen the Company to a point where possibility of calling upon Guarantors can be eliminated, in case of excessive losses. Our volume is but a small part of the insurable Methodist property in North Carolina and this is obviously due to many properties being insured and others carrying their insurance locally—mainly with an agent who is a member of the Church. If 80% of all Churches were insured in the Methodist Mutual then the volume should be sufficient to make for adequate safety.

The rates for Churches vary from 26c to 86c per \$100 for one year so that there must be a large volume of business to insure a premium income of any proportion.

Under management of the undersigned much time has been spent by the office staff and your General Agent in whipping into shape a satisfactory office system. We believe that we now have a system that is adequate for the amount of business now being done plus a conservative increase. Our system would, of course, have to be expanded should the policy of the Company be extended to take on general lines of insurance such as dwellings and preferred mercantile risks. Expenses have been kept low so that practically all of the overhead is made up of salaries, advertising and postage.

HOSPITAL BOARD

Since the General Hospital Board was created by the General Conference of 1922, our Church has put on or is now putting into service hospital properties worth around \$8,000,000. These hospitals now have in use 1,000 beds: they treat 23,000 patients a year; and have a year's income of \$1,500,000. There are eight Nurse Training Schools, where 450 young women are being trained to walk in the footprints of the young Prince of Glory who went about doing good and healing all manner of sickness.

We rejoice to see that the ministry of healing, so long neglected by our great Church, has at last found the way to the Church's heart and that it looks as if it will soon have a large place therein. We regret that so far the North Carolina Conference has had no part in this glorious ministry.

We are gratified to learn that the hospital at Tucson, Arizona, owned by the M. E. Church, South, has treated tubercular patients from all parts

of the country including preachers and one missionary from the foreign field. We wish to have part in its work. Be it resolved, therefore, that this Conference hereby authorizes the General Hospital Board, until further notice, to devote to said hospital all Golden Cross funds received by it to the credit of our Conference.

The indications are that the Golden Cross enrollment has been more generally observed than ever before, and larger results achieved in many sections and in order that ours may be another section in which this shall be true, we recommend that this Conference ask Bishop Mouzon to appoint W. H. Brown Conference Golden Cross Director.

We further recommend that this Conference, by the adoption of this paper, instruct the Conference Hospital Board to take membership in the Hospital Association of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and send W. H. Brown as a representative to sit in that body at its next annual meeting in St. Louis.

We request that the Budget Commission grant the Conference Board \$250 for the carrying on of this work in our Conference.

We would urge that all money collected through the Golden Cross be sent to our Conference Board Treasurer, E. N. Harrison.

Willie Ethel Poole, the subject of this sketch, was born July 2, 1892, at Gauley Bridge, West Virginia, and laid down her life and work in Wilson, North Carolina, April 12, 1927. Thus began and thus ended the career of one of the noblest characters it has ever been the privilege of the writer to know.

The daughter of Rev. and Mrs. S. A. Donahoe of the Virginia Conference, she could boast of a lineage and a religious training that

are worth more than all the gold of the world.

With such a religious background all the handiwork of God taught her of a loving Heavenly Father. The sighing of the pines, the songs of the birds and the surge of the seas along with the songs and prayers she heard in her godly home and her father's church taught her of a God to be worshiped and loved and served.

Thus at an early age her heart was opened to Christ. In a meeting conducted by her own father she surrendered her all to Christ and was quietly and beautifully converted. Immediately she joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, of which church she remained a devoted and loyal member to the day of her death.

The schools furnished the growing girl with a background that gave her an air of culture and refinement which manifested itself in her home and in all her relationships of life. Her grace and charm made her the center of attraction in the home while she lived under the parental roof; and more so after she became the wife of a Methodist preacher and the leader among the women in every place her devoted husband served as pastor. The prayers of godly parents and the instruction of faithful Sunday School teachers served to shape and build a character that made her all that a daughter, wife and mother can ever hope to be in this life.

While Miss Ethel was living in the city of Portsmouth, Virginia, where her father was pastor of Central Church, she was married to Rev. Ivey T. Poole, of the North Carolina Conference. The marriage took place in Central Methodist parsonage. Showered with flowers and kisses, she went from the parsonage home of her father to be the bride of a Methodist preacher and to grace another parsonage. Her whole life was spent in a parsonage.

After her marriage she gladly went with her husband to whatever charge he was appointed, without a word of complaint. In life's high calling she was faithful to her trust. Of her marriage were born four daughters: Leona Elizabeth, who died May 4, 1917; Adeline Donahoe, Ellen Medora and Mary Ethel, all of whom survive her.

Mrs. Poole was passionately fond of her children. She literally lived for them. Her motherly ministrations will be missed by them for many a day.

For more than a year previous to her death this faithful woman had seemed to realize that the end was near. She knew that an operation furnished her the only chance of living on earth; yet she always said that she would never return home following an operation. With her husband, her mother and other kind friends about her, she underwent an operation in Moore-Herring Hospital, Wilson, N. C., August 11. For a while she rallied and her recovery seemed possible, but soon there was a relapse, following which "her spirit returned to God who gave it" on the morning of August 12, 1927. Her body was returned to her parsonage home at Stantonsburg, from which place it was carried overland to Norfolk, Virginia, where the funeral was conducted from the Brambleton Avenue Methodist parsonage, August 14, in the afternoon, with Rev. George Wesley Jones, D.D., Presiding Elder of the Norfolk District, and the writer officiating. Large crowds attended the services, the floral tributes were profuse and beautiful, and many tender messages of sympathy were sent from far and near.

Following the service in the home the body was carried to the cemetery in Portsmouth and laid to rest beside her little daughter who had

died ten years before.

The sun shone beautifully, the birds sang sweetly, all nature seemed to exult because of an abundance of life everywhere; but the light of the sun and the songs of the birds and the glories of nature were shut out from many a heart that day by the dark cloud of sorrow that rested over them.

But it was not all darkness, for Jesus was there. His presence gave hope of another life for her and for us. On the day of the burial small children, middle aged men and women and decrepit old people shed tears of sympathy and grief; but one day, transfigured and redeemed we shall all stand beside our loved ones in the presence of Jesus. He shall wipe away all tears and be the light of our countenance forever.

Leaving "lilies of love and loyalty" the crowds gradually dispersed, singing in their hearts if not with their voices.

"Some day, somewhere, we shall know."

Besides her husband, three daughters, father and mother, Mrs. Poole leaves two brothers, Paul and Eugene, who loved their sister with all the affection that strong men can have.

All these are left to cherish the memory of a beautiful life that scattered sunshine and fragrance everywhere.

Willie Ethel Poole has gone home. Her noble life has left an influence that cannot die. It will live on and blossom anew in other hearts.

If we could hear her message to us today it would no doubt be:

"Let your face be like the morning While the days are going by."

So with faith in the Master, the beloved husband and all the other sorrowing loved ones tarry awhile to "carry on" until they, too, are called home.

JAMES ORIN GUTHRIE

James Orin Guthrie, son of Joseph B. and Sarah Evans Guthrie, was born at Kimbolton, Chatham County, North Carolina, September 23, 1855, and died at Dillon, South Carolina, April 25, 1927.

As would have been expected of one reared by a godly father and mother, Brother Guthrie early in life gave his heart to his Heavenly Father and joined the church; and, under the influence of Rev. William H. Moore, that sterling man of God, whom he loved and honored as long as he lived, entered the ministry and studied at Trinity College for several years to prepare himself for the pastorate.

At the Wilson Conference, November, 1879, he joined the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and for about twenty-five years served faithfully and efficiently the following charges: Straits, Hillsboro, Lenoir, Williamston, Fairfield and Amity, Rocky Mount, Laurinburg, Kinston, Warrenton, Selma and Fuquay Springs, the last place as a supply while in the supernumerary relation. He was largely instrumental in building the church at Fuquay

Springs, and also at Rocky Mount and Laurinburg.

Brother Guthrie was thrice married. His first wife was Miss Elizabeth Whitehurst, of Beaufort, N. C. Four children blessed this union, two of which, Mrs. W. F. Moody and Miss Bessie Guthrie, both of Raleigh, N. C., now live. His second wife was Mrs. Jessie Stubbs Simmons of Williamston, N. C. Three children were born to this union—one, Mrs. Eloise Kearney of Richmond, Virginia, still lives. He was married to Mrs. Effie Berry, Dillon, South Carolina, just a few months before he passed to the beyond. She survives him, as also two brothers, B. O. Guthrie, Burlington, N. C., and J. A. Guthrie, Cross Hill, S. C., and four sisters, Mrs. Nannie G. Pugh, Greensboro, N. C., Mrs. P. H. Highfills, Winston-Salem, N. C., Mrs. J. H. Stackhouse, Dillon, S. C., and Mrs. J. H. Nance, Cross Hill, S. C.

I am appending here an appreciation of Brother Guthrie written by Dr. Thomas M. Jordan, of the staff of physicians of the State Hospital, who was intimately acquainted with him for nearly half a cen-

tury, and knew him as few did.

"To properly estimate the value of a farm, one would like to see the hills, the rivulets, the wooded hillsides and plains, the springs of sparkling life-giving water, the productive soil and the position in relation to neighbors, schools, and towns. By no single one of these characteristics would we estimate the usefulness of the property, but from a critical survey of all together would a proper estimate be obtained. And so, when we undertake to establish man's place in society; his value to the time in which he lived; his influence for good or evil upon the minds of those whose lives he touched; it is necessary that one should know for a considerable period of time the one whose memory he would perpetuate for the consideration of others. Having known intimately Brother J. O. Guthrie, now deceased, two-thirds of his entire life, and having had relations with him in every sphere of his activities, it is a real pleasure to say that, viewed as a whole, the con-

clusion forces itself upon me that it was a real benediction to hold fellowship and unbroken friendship for the half century of our acquaintance. First, I knew him, the young preacher of one of his early charges; and even then he was a preacher of more force and eloquence than might have been expected of one of such tender years. But having been rearred by pious parents in an age and community where simple faith in God was paramount, he abode in the belief that trusting in God, he could ask for and would receive Divine aid in rightly presenting the words of truth, both in sermon and in prayer—and the response of his congregations on such occasions impressed one that his Lord heard and answered his appeals. In fact, James O. Guthrie was a preacher of extraordinary ability, and I am satisfied that if the condition of his health, and of other things, had permitted him to give his entire time to the ministry, he could easily have been the peer of any preacher of his age.

It was later in life when, under the advice of physicians that he should desist from continuous pulpit work, that I knew him as a business man. And in business he displayed that same faith that characterized him in his ministerial career, always looking to and trusting in the Heavenly Father for guidance; and I always felt that his feeling in regard to his business career was that he at all times was doing a work that met the approval of his Maker. But while he followed business assiduously, he never forsook the ministry; and as long as strength lasted, preached on occasions wherever and whenever opportunity offered. He was ever ready, willing and able to speak for his Lord, and spoke with an ability, that could not have been so pronounced and earnest had he not had an assurance of his calling derived from harmonious relations with the Great Spirit.

Being a man of remarkable versatility and having a most tenacious memory for incidents occurring in a wide circle of acquaintances, he was the most interesting conversationalist I ever knew. He loved argument for argument's sake, but never poisoned the arrow with which he wounded his adversary; and when the battle of wits subsided, good will and friendship abode. He was the soul of good humor itself, and he loved mankind devotedly. He was hospitable and unselfish to his own material inconvenience. His sense of honor was so exalted that I have known him voluntarily to give to his partners in business the profits that legally belonged to himself. To him, "it was more blessed to give than to receive." And unto the end of his days his faith in the providence of God was strong and abiding. Despite a long and trying sickness he was always cheerful and uncomplaining and frequently said to his friends that he was waiting patiently the call to his eternal home. His numerous acquaintances will recall his sparkling wit, his cheerful, happy disposition that radiated sunshine and good fellowship wherever he went-and be happier because he touched their lives."

ALLISON LEE ORMOND

Allison Lee Ormond, pastor of Oxford M. E. Church, South, passed away in Philadelphia on February 17, 1927, in a hospital where he had gone for treatment two weeks before. The end came unexpectedly as his numerous friends thought that he was on the road to a speedy recovery. Funeral services were held in the Oxford Methodist Church and his body laid to rest in Durham, N. C. Rev. M. T. Plyler, assisted by Rev. A. S. Barnes, officiated at the service.

Allie Ormond was of sturdy and devout parents. He was born in Greene County, September 9, 1862, being the son of John J. and Nancy J. Ormond. He received his preparatory education at Davis' School in LaGrange, N. C., and his college education at Trinity College, now Duke University. One of his friends who was in college with him states that he was mature in years and was one of the most influential men of his class. He was president of the Y. M. C. A., manaager of the football team, and in general took an interest in all college activities. He was known as one of the best mixers in school and his hearty laugh was contagious. This wholesome spirit lived with him through the years.

At Goldsboro, N. C., in 1892, Bishop Duncan presiding over the Conference, be joined the North Carolina Conference. On February, 16, 1892, he was married to Miss Ella Kirby Crawford of Wayne County. Of this union there were born five children: W. W., who preceded him to the grave by two years, Edith Swindell, who died during this summer, Myra Crawford, Jennie Ophelia, and Allison Lee, Jr., who with their mother survive. He also had four brothers: W. W. and Ernest C., who preceded him to the grave, Herbert C., who now lives in Hookerton, and Reverend J. M., who now lives in Durham, being a member of the faculty of Duke University. There were two sisters: Irene Ormond, who died in 1905, and Mrs. Laura Turnage, who now lives in Ayden.

Allison Ormond's ministry covered a period of over thirty years, and he served faithfully many charges over the North Carolina Conference. He served one year on the Burlington Circuit, two years on the Craven Circuit, two on the Goldsboro, one year in Smithfield, Cary four, Tar River four, Kenly two, Fayetteville Circuit two, Durham-Carr church four, Maxton four, Rockingham four, Wilmington Fifth Avenue two, Nashville one, and he was in his second year at Oxford when the end came.

On circuit or station this man was always known as a man of high ideals and lofty character. As a man of God he was held in the highest respect by all who knew him. His preaching was effective and was of the evangelistic type. He possessed a fine emotional nature and the qualities of his heart held the ascendency over the head. Here his power in the pulpit lay since his sermons gained their force and effectiveness from the devotion and genuineness of the man who ever spoke out of a full heart.

Allie Ormond was first of all a man of gentleness. No matter what disturbed the affairs of life he never became excited, but with his gen-

tle manner, he always met the issue squarely. In pulpit, in shadows, in battle, or amidst the calm of peace, his gentle speech was ever present. Many afflictions came his way, also numerous disappointments, but all seemed to increase his gentle demeanor.

Again, he was a man who held no malice. His spiritual life was too deeply rooted to allow hate to enter his lofty soul. More than once do I recall hearing him say that he could fully forgive any hurt, and more than once he exemplified the statement by his acts. He loved his God devotedly, and also had a great love for his fellowmen. His love for men overshadowed all else and in the trying hour of his life, he met life's issues in a manner that was beautiful to behold. Living as he did, close to Christ, he embodied much of this spirit and delighted to carry the burdens of others. Oftentimes in conversation with him I found that his first thoughts were not of himself but of his loved ones, his friends, and his people. In this way he became a great bearer of burdens. However, none of the conditions in life or work ever weakened his faith in God. He only learned more and more of His great truth. During his last years his health had not been good. Many cares had come his way, and his mission in life seemed to become a greater task, but he never lost sight of the goal. Delightfully situated in Oxford, the old fire came back and, despite his hardships, his beautiful character stood out in even a larger measure.

Allie Ormond had a host of friends who mourn his going. We shall miss him, but he has gone to God who doeth all things well and will keep him in that perfect peace that he loved so well and endeavored to impart to the world.

JOSEPH EDGAR HOLDEN

Joseph Edgar Holden was born in Franklin County, North Carolina, January 1, 1869, and died in New Bern, North Carolina, October 26, 1927. He was sick about three weeks. All that was known to do for him was done. He knew that he was seriously ill, but was unafraid to go.

At the early age of twelve he was converted and joined the Methodist Church. This experience enabled him to get a greater vision of life and its possibility. So through the years he labored until he was called to preach. Then it was that he began to fit himself for his life's work. He entered Trinity College in 1896 and graduated in

June, 1900. Soon after finishing college he went to Fairfield in Hyde County, where he supplied until Conference. During the year he was married to Miss Mattie Angell of Virginia. She and their daughter, Lucille, survive him.

His was a well-rounded, robust life. He was uncompromising in his fight on sin, but gentle mannered and warm hearted in all his ministrations. He knew how to be a friend and rejoiced in this fellowship. He read the best books and his preaching was of an exceptionally high order. The natural gift of humor and the ability to think straight and see into things with poetic sweep of imagination held those whose good fortune it was to hear him preach. All of expressions were marked as his own. They came from him as the voice of the winds from everywhere, but with a definite purpose. His poems, some of which have been printed, were anonymously signed.

He was a great lover of nature and from its rich storehouse most of his beautiful illustrations and poems came. He was fond of the outdoor sports and found in them temporary relief from the burdened heart which every true pastor carries. There swings at the dock in Morehead City a craft without a master. He built it in his spare mo-

ments and used it for the joy of his friends.

Not only did he love nature, but he loved folk. He was a fouryear man—his last year was invariably his best. He entered into the life of his people; knew where they lived and knew what they were thinking. He was a good shepherd. His work among men and boys seemed most to appeal to him. The organization of Beavers among the boys of the town has been of untold good. The idea and plans for making it go were his own. I trust that he has left plans for still greater extension and usefulness of this organization.

Most of the time he spent in our Conference he was secretary of the Conference Extension Board. No one could have been more pains-taking and impartial in distributing this fund to the needy churches of the Conference. The following charges were blessed by his labors as pastor: Fairfield 1900-03, Scotland Neck 1903-07, Enfield 1907-11, Ridgeway 1911-15, Rich Square 1915-19, Kenly 1919-23, Clinton

1923-25, Morehead City 1925-27.

His ministry at Morehead City was joyous, thus making a fitting climax to all his years in the ministry. His gospel was primarily to men, tinged with a touch of the poetic and shot through with sincerity, clothed in choice English which made him a preacher of power.

It was not his way to plan for himself. His thought was for others and nothing gave him more pleasure than to provide for the joy of others. This fine trait of his found a whole-hearted response in the Morehead people. During the few weeks of his sickness all the town was deeply interested in his recovery. The day of the operation, business was suspended in the city for the hour. But he was gone in a few more hours. Many of his brethren and all his friends who could get into the church attended the funeral.

He sleeps within the sound of the restless sea. His life was victorious, so his going was triumphant.

We shall miss him so much. But we know of his inheritance, incorruptible, undefiled, and it is one that fadeth not away. Peace to his soul.

MARIOTT BETTS DAVIS

Mariott Betts Davis had a vital relationship to our Methodism. She was born in the parsonage at Rolesville, N. C., September 29, 1873, the daughter of Dr. A. D. Betts and Mary Elizabeth Davis Betts, and grew up in a home whose atmosphere was charged with the faith and teachings of the Methodist Church. As she approached womanhood, she accepted these teachings as the basis on which she built the hopes, the aspirations, the achievements of her maturer years.

She was educated at Greensboro College, receiving her diploma in 1849. During the years at college she contributed much to the religious life of the institution that has always had the power to turn her students on "Whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report."

On March 17, 1897, Mariott Blake Betts was united in marriage to Rev. R. L. Davis in Nashville, N. C. As the wife of an itinerant minister she lived with a consecration to duty, accepting the work assigned with courage and optimism.

When children came into her home and the burdens of life grew heavier, she kept the same spirit of devotion to duty, of deep concern for others and for the advancement of the church. No matter how the cares of the household increased, she was always punctual in attending public worship.

Mariott Davis was not a woman who moved in conspicuous places. She had neither the desire nor the qualifications to incite the applause of the multitude. Her great ability and her ambitions were in the opposite direction. Hers was the persuasive influence of persistent purity.

Being attractive in personal appearance, interested in everybody's welfare and possessing a spirit of good cheer, she was always welface and possessing a spirit of good cheer, she was always welfacened in any social groups yet she never sought to widen her sphere her home and church, for she felt very keenly the responsibility of being mother to eight children, and also she found her highest joy in ministering to them and to the man whom she had chosen as her life companion. She felt the responsibility of walking before them as a Christian mother; she also felt the great responsibility of warning them of the dangers that might ensaare them. But in the midst of the vicissitudes of life, whatever time and change wrought, she kept the same tranquility of soul which must have been the result of a "conscience void of offense toward God and toward man."

Some years ago her oldest son died and was buried in Warrenton, N. C., nearby where she was laid to rest on Sunday afternoon, August 7, 1927.

In 1899 North Carolina territory in the Holston Conference and in the Virginia Conference, except that beyond the Chown River, was transferred to the North Carolina Conference, and the Conference was divided into the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. In 1894 the remaining North Carolina territory in the Virginia Conference was transferred to the North Carolina Conference.
