Announcements:

Announcements were made and the Conference adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Mouzon.

SECOND DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

Thursday, November 23, 1933.

The Conference convened at 3 p. m., Bishop E. D. Mouzon presiding.

Devotional exercises were conducted by the Bishop.

Minutes Approved:

The Committee on Minutes reported that the minutes of the two former sessions had been read and approved.

Question 21:

Question 21 was called, and the preachers in the Durham District and a number of those in the Elizabeth City District reported, and their characters were passed.

First Ballot for Lay Delegates to the General Conference:

No. 8, in reference to lay delegates, non-concurrence.

No. 9, in reference to ritual, non-concurrence.

No. 10, in reference to use of tobacco, non concurrence. (See Appendix).

Alternate Lay Ballot No. 2:

REPORT NO. 1—BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Your board notes with sympathetic interest the splendid work that is being done by our General Board of Christian Education. We wish to express our appreciation of the services which they are rendering the Conference boards and we wish to assure them of the heartiest co-operation of which we are capable.

We are glad to report continued progress along all lines of work which have been committed to our board this year. In spite of the great handicap which we have suffered financially and in the reduction of our office staff, we have been able to carry on our work in a highly satisfactory manner. Mr. L. L. Gobbel, our Executive Secretary, and Mrs. Blanche Barringer Brian, our Extension Secretary and Director of Young People's Work, have willingly and untiringly assumed the extra burdens imposed upon them and have achieved remarkable success in spite of the difficulties under which they have labored. A detailed investigation of their work will show that the local church department has made definite progress along the following lines:

1. *Training Work.* 674 Standard certificates have been awarded in Standard Training schools, pastors' school, correspondence work, and otherwise. 1,046 Cokesbury certificates have been awarded in a total of 103 Cokesbury schools and in local classes. 495 Christian Culture certificates and 156 Christian Adventure certificates have also been awarded, making a total of nearly 2,500 training awards for the year.

2. *Institutes.* More than 40 district and sub-district institutes and rallies have been held, at which approximately 5,000 people have had the educational work of the church presented to them in an effective manner.

3. *Special Days.* An increased number of schools have observed Sunday School Day and a corresponding increase is also noted in the observance of Young People's Day.

4. *Summer Assemblies.* Three summer assemblies were held with a total attendance of 400 and with the awarding of 640 credits. This is a distinct advance over last year's work in that field.

5. *Missionary Education.* There has been a distinct advance in our missionary education in extent and in amount of monies raised also. More than \$4,000 has been raised for the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise this year. The greatest line of advance has been in the Young People's Mission Special, which was increased approximately \$500.

6. *Temperance Education.* Your board has rendered valued service through its various institutes and through the personal efforts of its employed staff in keeping North Carolina's prohibition record clean.

7. *Vacation Schools.* More than twice as many Vacation Schools have been held this year as last, the total number of schools being 62, with an enrollment of more than 4,000 pupils.

8. *College Co-operation.* College Day has been emphasized throughout our Conference, and whatever assistance could be rendered our church schools has been enthusiastically given. We have also co-operated with the Western North Carolina Conference in holding a state-wide Methodist Students' Conference at Greensboro.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. We recommend the continuation of the program of last year with especial emphasis upon the following points: the holding of a conference council; the promotion of Cokesbury and Standard Training Schools; the holding of one Young People's Assembly and one or more Christian Adventure Assemblies; the conducting of sub-district and other institutes wherever necessary and practicable; co-operation with Western North Carolina Conference and General Board in a state-wide Methodist Students' Conference; the observance of such special days as are recommended by the General Board; the holding of Vacation Schools; and the further organization of local church boards of Christian education where they are not already set up.

2. We recommend that our hearty co-operation be given to the program of Christian education outlined by the General board and that our staff be represented at the General Council meeting.

3. We recommend that our hearty support be given our church schools and colleges in every possible manner. We are especially grateful to Duke University for the use of six Cokesbury workers, whose effective service we gratefully acknowledge. We request that the same number be assigned to us for the summer of 1934.

SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES

Reports from our institutions of learning are such as to afford gratification and encouragement. It is apparent that in our schools an earnest and intelligent effort is being made to really equip youth with Christian training.

LOUISBURG COLLEGE

Under the presidency of Reverend A. D. Wilcox, Louisburg College is able to report an increase of 15% in its student enrollment over the enrollment of the same period in 1932. The trustees, in their statement to this board, reveal the fact that despite fearful odds, the college is gradually and perceptibly gaining ground in a financial way. It is the firm conviction of those most intimate with present affairs at Louisburg that, with the return of even a limited degree of economic normalcy, the college will be able to regain its equilibrium and continue to prove its peculiar usefulness in an ever-enlarging field of service.

GREENSBORO COLLEGE

Greensboro College has experienced a healthy increase in its enrollment in comparison with the student body of the same date one year ago, and, through heroic efforts, there is being maintained a high level of scholastic work.

Besieged by a deluge of requests from students desiring self-help, and confronted with the uncomfortable realization that numbers of students are seeking their education at less expensive schools, Greensboro is having hard battles to fight. However, because the battle is hard, the fighting is being pushed with added determination, and the future bids fair to disclose heartening results.

DUKE UNIVERSITY

True to the undergirding Christian ideals upon which the institution's bases rest, Duke University goes forward, winning the respect of intelligent men throughout our nation, and broadening always the scope of an influence for good which is already beyond human evaluation. Consistently striving to bring about the congenial marriage of knowledge and vital piety, Duke University stands forth as a city set upon a hill. Intelligent power and inherent goodness is the consummation devoutly wished at Duke University.

THE PASTORS' SCHOOL

The 1933 session of the North Carolina Pastors' School, which met in co-operation with the Institute of International Relations, was in many respects the most successful of all our pastors' schools. Plans are now being perfected for an institute to be held at Duke University next June designed primarily to meet the needs of rural ministers of all denominations in the state of North Carolina and adjacent territory. Such an enterprising undertaking should command the most cordial co-operation on the part of our Pastors' School.

We recommend the election and confirmation of A. J. Hobbs, Jr., as a trustee of Greensboro College, succeeding J. A. Long, resigned.

We recommend the confirmation of the following as trustees of Louisburg College: C. G. Morris, for term ending 1934; and E. J. Rees, O. W. Dowd, Mrs. Gurney P. Hood, F. B. McKinne, and G. W. Perry, for the term ending 1936.

We recommend the confirmation of D. C. Roper, H. A. Page, M. E. Newsom, and W. R. Perkins to succeed themselves as trustees of Duke University.

We recommend that L. L. Gobbel be continued as Executive Secretary at a salary of \$3,000, and that Mrs. Blanche Barringer Brian be continued as Extension Secretary and Director of Young People's Work at a salary of \$1,500.

We nominate for membership on this board: J. O. Long to fill vacancy created by resignation of W. A. Stanbury, and Mrs. E. R. Clark to fill vacancy caused by resignation of Mrs. J. LeGrand Everett.

REPORT NO. 3—SPECIAL CONFERENCE EDUCATIONAL COMMISSION

CONCERNING THE MERGING OF DAVENPORT AND GREENSBORO COLLEGES AT GREENSBORO

At the 1932 sessions of the North Carolina Conference and of the Western North Carolina Conference an Inter-Conference Educational Commission, consisting of W. A. Stanbury, R. L. Flowers, and E. C. Few, for the North Carolina Conference; and W. W. Peele, G. Ray Jordan, and J. F. Spruill, for the Western North Carolina Conference, was appointed to consider inter-conference educational matters that might arise during the year.

Early in the spring of this year your Special Educational Commission, in carrying forward the instructions of the Conference concerning the merging of Davenport and Greensboro College at Greensboro, requested "The members of the Inter-Conference Committee from the North Carolina Conference to cooperate with the members of the Inter-Conference Committee representing the Western North Carolina Conference, and with the assistance of Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon, and with the advice of counsel, to work out all details necessary to complete this merger, and to provide for carrying on the work of these two institutions until the merger here provided for shall have been completed."

The report of the work of this Inter-Conference Committee is made now to this Conference in this Report No. 3 of your Educational Commission.

Two things were necessary in preparing the way for the merging of these institutions as directed by the Conference: The preparation of a form of charter, and the nomination of a Board of Trustees.

A form of charter for the merged institution was submitted to the trustees both of Greensboro and Davenport Colleges and each board was invited to make suggestions of any modifications desired. These suggestions, so far as seemed practicable, have been incorporated in the form of the charter that is herewith submitted.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. We recommend that the name of the institution resulting from the merging of Davenport College and of Greensboro College be the hyphenated name of Greensboro-Davenport College.

2. The form of charter for the new Greensboro-Davenport College is here-with submitted for your adoption.

3. The trustees nominated for Greensboro-Davenport College are as follows:

We recommend that the Conference instruct the Boards of Trustees of Davenport and Greensboro Colleges to meet at the earliest practicable time and each to take the necessary steps to merge in the consolidated Greensboro-Davenport College under the charter adopted by this Conference and with the Board of Trustees elected by the Conference.

5. In order to represent the Conference in co-operation with the Western North Carolina Conference in the completion of the merger of Greensboro and Davenport Colleges, we recommend that R. L. Flowers, E. C. Few, and H. E. Spence be appointed to act with a like number from the Western North Carolina Conference as an Inter-Conference Commission, with power to complete this merger.

6. We recommend that the Conference request the trustees of Greensboro-Davenport College to consider the advisability of operating an academy at Lenoir, North Carolina, in the buildings of the former Davenport College.

CONSOLIDATION AGREEMENT MADE UNDER AUTHORITY OF
CHAPTER 408 OF THE NORTH CAROLINA PUBLIC LAWS OF 1933

THIS CONSOLIDATION AGREEMENT, Made this _____ day of _____, 1933, by and between DAVENPORT COLLEGE, a corporation chartered, organized and existing by virtue of authority of the General Assembly of North Carolina as contained in Chapter 82, Private Laws of 1859, as amended, party of the first part, and GREENSBORO COLLEGE, a corporation chartered, organized and existing by virtue of authority of the General Assembly of North Carolina as contained in Chapter 130, Private Laws of 1905, as amended, party of the second part.

WITNESSETH:

For and in consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained DAVENPORT COLLEGE and GREENSBORO COLLEGE have agreed to consolidate, and do hereby consolidate, into a single corporation, whose corporate name shall be "GREENSBORO-DAVENPORT COLLEGE, INC.", to such full extent that "GREENSBORO-DAVENPORT COLLEGE, INC.", shall be deemed the successor of DAVENPORT COLLEGE and of GREENSBORO COLLEGE and hereafter "GREENSBORO-DAVENPORT COLLEGE, INC.", shall own all property, real, personal, and mixed, tangible and intangible, and hold the title thereto, and shall succeed to and have all rights, privileges and powers, and shall assume and be liable for the payment of all debts and liabilities, both of DAVENPORT COLLEGE and of GREENSBORO COLLEGE to the full extent authorized and provided by Chapter 408 of the Public Laws of North Carolina, 1933.

IT IS AGREED that the charter or certificate of incorporation of the consolidated corporation, namely, "GREENSBORO-DAVENPORT COLLEGE, INC.", is as follows:

CERTIFICATE OF INCORPORATION OF GREENSBORO-DAVENPORT
COLLEGE, INC.

ARTICLE I

The name of this (consolidated) corporation is GREENSBORO-DAVENPORT COLLEGE, INC.

ARTICLE II

The location of the principal office of this corporation in this state is at Greensboro, Guilford County, North Carolina.

ARTICLE III

The objects for which this corporation is formed are to establish, conduct and operate at Greensboro, Guilford County, North Carolina, an educational institution of collegiate grade for women to be known as GREENSBORO-DAVENPORT COLLEGE, INC., with power to establish and maintain in connection with GREENSBORO-DAVENPORT COLLEGE, INC., an institution or institutions of primary and intermediate education at its site in Greensboro, North Carolina, and at such other points as it may determine, in trust for the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and under the control and direction of the Western North Carolina Conference and of the North Carolina Conference of the said church; and, in order properly to prosecute said objects, this corporation shall have full power and authority to purchase, lease, and otherwise acquire, hold, mortgage, convey and otherwise dispose of, all kinds of property, both real and personal; to construct, equip and maintain buildings, works and plants; to install, maintain and operate all kinds of machinery and appliances; and generally to perform all acts which may be deemed necessary or expedient for

the proper and successful prosecution of the objects for which this corporation is formed.

ARTICLE IV

This corporation shall have no capital stock. Through its Board of Trustees, hereinafter provided, this corporation shall be conducted and operated as a non-profit corporation, for the purposes of Christian education, in trust for the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and subject to the control and direction of the Western North Carolina Conference and of the North Carolina Conference of the said church.

ARTICLE V

Subject to the control and direction of the Western North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and of the North Carolina Conference of the said church, as hereinafter more fully set forth, the business and affairs of this corporation shall be administered and managed by a governing body, to be known as the Board of Trustees, consisting of eighteen (18) members, the original members of such Board of Trustees being the persons whose names and post office addresses are as follows:

Greensboro-Davenport College Alumnae Association shall consist of all graduates and former students of Greensboro College and its predecessors and of Davenport College and its predecessors who may form themselves into an Alumnae Association under rules and regulations satisfactory to themselves.

Of the trustees named in this article, C. A. Bray, J. B. Craven, G. T. Adams, E. L. Hillman, Mrs. M. H. Courtney, and F. C. Odell shall hold office until October 31, 1935, and until their successors are elected; J. E. Lambeth, G. T. Rowe, A. J. Hobbs, Jr., M. T. Plyler, Miss Anna Ogburn, and Dr. Dred Peacock shall hold office until October 31, 1937, and until their successors are elected; and Frank Sherrill, L. D. Thompson, Marvin Wade, C. S. Wallace, Mrs. Glenn Long, and Miss Nannie Lee Smith shall hold office until October 31, 1939, and until their successors are elected.

The successors of the trustees above named shall be nominated and elected in the following manner:

Prior to the thirty-first day of October, 1935, and biennially thereafter, e. g., on or before the thirty-first day of October of the years 1937, 1939, 1941, 1943, etc., six (6) persons shall be nominated by the Board of Trustees of GREENSBORO-DAVENPORT COLLEGE, INC., to serve as trustees for the term of six (6) years and until their successors are elected. The names of the two persons nominated to represent the Western North Carolina Conference shall be submitted to the current session of the Western North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, for election or rejection. The names of the two persons nominated to represent the North Carolina Conference shall be submitted to the current session of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, for election or rejection. The name of the two persons nominated to represent the Greensboro-Davenport College Alumnae Association shall be submitted to the Greensboro-Davenport College Alumnae Association for election or rejection.

The Western North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, shall have power, at any time, by a majority vote of its members to remove from office any trustee elected by such Conference.

The North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, shall have power, at any time, by a majority vote of its members to remove from office any trustee elected by such Conference.

Any trustee or trustees elected by the Alumnae Association of Greensboro-Davenport College, Inc., may be removed by concurrent action of the Western North Carolina Conference and of the North Carolina Conference. Should there exist a vacancy by death, or resignation, or otherwise, of any trustee, the same shall be filled for the unexpired term by the Western North Carolina Conference or the North Carolina Conference or the Alumnae Association of Greensboro-Davenport College, Inc., as provided above for the election of trustees.

Members of the said Board of Trustees must be at least 21 years of age; and at all times at least three-fourths of the members of said Board of Trustees must be members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

In case the Western North Carolina Conference refuses to confirm any trustee representing that Conference nominated by the Board of Trustees, the board shall nominate another. If the Western North Carolina Conference shall reject the second nomination, the Western North Carolina Conference Board of Christian Education shall nominate for the vacancy, and the Conference shall confirm or reject. This shall be a process until such vacancy is filled.

In case the North Carolina Conference refuses to confirm any trustee representing that Conference nominated by the Board of Trustees, the board shall nominate another. If the North Carolina Conference shall reject the second nomination, the North Carolina Conference Board of Christian Education shall nominate for the vacancy, and the Conference shall confirm or reject. This shall be a process until such vacancy is filled.

In case the Greensboro-Davenport College Alumnae Association refuses to confirm any trustee nominated by the Board of Trustees, the board shall nominate another. If the Alumnae Association shall reject the second nomination, the Boards of Christian Education of the North Carolina Conference and of the Western North Carolina Conference, acting jointly, shall nominate for the vacancy and the Greensboro-Davenport alumnae shall confirm or reject. This shall be the process until such vacancy is filled.

ARTICLE VI

The said Board of Trustees shall administer the affairs of this corporation and conduct its business in trust for the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and subject to the control and direction of the Western North Carolina Conference and of the North Carolina Conference of said church; provided, however, said Board of Trustees shall have no power to sell, convey, mortgage, or otherwise

dispose of any of the real estate owned by this corporation, unless authorized to do so both by the Western North Carolina Conference and the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. This proviso shall not apply to a mortgage to be executed by this corporation to secure payment of the balance purchase price of real property purchased by and conveyed to this corporation, nor to real estate belonging to any Trust Fund of the college. Nothing herein contained shall in any way affect or impair the ownership by this corporation of any property, real or personal, tangible or intangible, heretofore owned either by DAVENPORT COLLEGE or by GREENSBORO COLLEGE, notwithstanding such property may be now encumbered by mortgage or other liens.

ARTICLE VII

This corporation is authorized to acquire and receive real and personal property by purchase, gift, devise, or otherwise, and to hold and to administer such property for the benefit of GREENSBORO-DAVENPORT COLLEGE, INC., and in accordance with the uses and trusts, if any, declared in any and all conveyances or other instrument under which such property is acquired. Specifically, this corporation is authorized to succeed to and own all property, real, personal, and mixed, tangible and intangible, and hold the title thereto, and to succeed to and own all rights, privileges and powers, including all powers necessary to administer all trust funds upon the uses and trusts declared in any will, deed or other instrument, and to assume and be liable for the payment of all debts and liabilities, both of DAVENPORT COLLEGE and of GREENSBORO COLLEGE, to the full extent authorized and provided and conferred upon such consolidated corporation by Chapter 408 of the Public Laws of North Carolina, 1933.

ARTICLE VIII

The said Board of Trustees shall have power to make rules, regulations, and by-laws, not inconsistent with law and not inconsistent with the provisions hereof. The said Board of Trustees shall fix the time and place of holding their annual and other meetings and shall elect the following officers of this corporation, namely, a President of its Board of Trustees, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and such other officers as it may determine. Also the said Board of Trustees shall elect the faculty, including the President of GREENSBORO-DAVENPORT COLLEGE, INC., and such other employees as it may deem necessary. The said Board of Trustees shall annually elect, from members of said Board of Trustees, an Executive Committee consisting of five (5) members, which Executive Committee shall have the powers and shall perform the duties to be fixed by the by-laws. The President of GREENSBORO-DAVENPORT COLLEGE, INC., shall be ex-officio a member of said Executive Committee.

ARTICLE IX

Seven (7) trustees shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any regular or called meetings of said Board of Trustees; and it shall be the duty of said Board of Trustees, or of its said Executive Committee, as shall be determined, to fix the salaries of the faculty and other employees, and to make all contracts and agreements necessary to the business and management of the corporation.

ARTICLE X

The faculty of GREENSBORO-DAVENPORT COLLEGE, INC., and the Board of Trustees of GREENSBORO-DAVENPORT COLLEGE, INC., shall have power to confer degrees and marks of honor such as are conferred by colleges and universities generally when licensed or authorized to do so under the laws of North Carolina.

ARTICLE XI

The period of existence of this corporation is unlimited.

IT IS AGREED THAT this consolidation agreement, when executed and acknowledged in accordance with law, and having attached thereto the written consent of a majority of the present trustees of DAVENPORT COLLEGE and a majority of the present trustees of GREENSBORO COLLEGE, shall be filed in the office of the Secretary of State of North Carolina; and when so filed, the separate legal existence of DAVENPORT COLLEGE and of GREENSBORO COLLEGE thereupon shall be merged into GREENSBORO-DAVENPORT COLLEGE, INC., and thereafter there shall be only one corporation, namely, GREENSBORO-DAVENPORT COLLEGE, INC., having as its charter the Certificate of Incorporation fully set forth above. When this has been done, the powers and duties of the present Board of Trustees of DAVENPORT COLLEGE and the powers and duties of the present Board of Trustees of GREENSBORO COLLEGE shall immediately cease and terminate; and thereafter the said present Boards of Trustees and the present officers of the two corporations joining in this consolidation shall exercise no further powers or duties except to execute such deeds, assignments, conveyances, or other documents, which shall or may be necessary to carry into full effect the terms and provisions hereof.

IN WITNESS HEREOF, DAVENPORT COLLEGE has caused this agreement to be executed in its name and behalf by the President of the Board of Trustees, attested by the Secretary thereof, and its corporate seal hereto affixed, and has caused to be attached hereto the written consent of a majority of its trustees, all pursuant to resolution adopted by its Board of Trustees by majority vote at a meeting duly called and convened, and GREENSBORO COLLEGE has caused this agreement to be executed in its name and behalf by the President of the Board of Trustees, attested by the Secretary thereof, and its corporate seal hereto affixed, and has caused to be attached hereto the written consent of a majority of its trustees, all pursuant to resolution adopted by its Board of Trustees by majority vote at a meeting duly called and convened.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

Your Board of Church Extension submits the following report:

It is with regret that on account of the depressed financial conditions your board has not had funds to meet the demands made for new donations during the year. We are happy to report that all previous grants have been paid on a seventy-five per cent basis. This, however, does not meet all the obligations of your board.

On October 1, 1925, the Conference board secured a loan from the General board in the amount of \$8,000, and donated this sum to Chapel Hill Church. A balance of \$2,000 of this amount is three years past due. Your board orders payments on principal and interest on this debt in the amount of \$1,080.

In order to keep faith with other boards, it was ordered that we pay \$800 on the interest of the Chapel Hill Church debt, and \$400 on the interest of College Place Church debt.

The Conference board also made the following donations under the conditions given:

CHURCHES

Ann Street Church, Beaufort—Donation of \$200. Loan of \$400.

PARSONAGES

Oriental—A sum not to exceed \$400 was left in the hands of the Executive Committee to prevent the loss by forced sale of the parsonage at Oriental.

Spring Hope Circuit—A donation of \$150 was made on the condition that the charge provide \$250.

Conetoe—Difficulties having arisen with reference to an embarrassing situation, the board ordered the Executive Committee to investigate and, if possible, make economical adjudications.

FLOOD SITUATION IN THE EAST

Several churches were completely destroyed and other churches were greatly damaged by the recent storms. The people were left homeless and penniless. Your board deemed this the most responsible work of rehabilitation which has ever come before us. We are dealing with it as a great emergency, and the Executive Committee was instructed to make a thorough survey of the situation and deal with it as promptly and liberally as our limited means will allow. The Executive Committee will attend to this at once as an emergency measure. This work will probably require a two-year program.

We recommend the following applications to the General board:

Woodland Church, Rich Square Circuit—A donation of \$500 and a loan of \$1,000 when the church raises sufficient funds which, with this donation and loan, will satisfy the liability against the property held by the Jefferson Life Insurance Company.

Allensville Church, Brooksdale Circuit, Durham District—A donation of \$250.

We earnestly urge our preachers to be very careful in the future about their contraction of debts to insurance companies.

We are grateful for the co-operation and aid of the Duke Foundation in assisting needy churches. They have contributed this year to our Conference the generous sum of \$6,375.

We suggest to any congregation contemplating the erection of a house of worship that Rev. J. M. Ormond be consulted as to plans.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

To the Bishop and members of the North Carolina Conference, Durham, N. C.:
Your Conference Board of Christian Literature submits its annual report as follows:

Realizing the profound influence of the printed page in the directing of thought and formation of character, we earnestly recommend the intelligent and systematic circulation and reading of the best Christian material available today.

PUBLISHING HOUSE LITERATURE

We call attention to the fact that the literature issued by our Publishing House meets this test. It is of the highest order, written and edited by scholarly Christian men and women and for the specific purpose of meeting the needs of our Methodist people. The outstanding purpose of the Publishing House management is to supply literature at the lowest price consistent with production cost. According to available information, its prices on Sunday school literature are the lowest found anywhere, and efforts are being made to reduce them still more. It is well, too, to remember that a considerable sum from the profits of the Publishing House is each year distributed to the various annual Conferences for the super-annuates. Regardless of unfavorable economic conditions, \$50,000 was appropriated for this purpose during the past year. We, therefore, recommend the use of this literature and urge our preachers and laymen to co-operate in this commendable enterprise.

CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE

If our people are to be intelligent Methodists, it is essential that they keep themselves thoroughly informed regarding the wider program and work of our entire church. The *Christian Advocate* is the one official organ that meets this need. This general organ most creditably represents the thought and life of our denomination; it contains information concerning important movements within our church and throughout the world. Notwithstanding its importance, its circulation is decidedly inadequate. We suggest, therefore, that an honest effort be made to place this publication in the homes of our people wherever possible.

THE NORTH CAROLINA CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE

The Auditor's report on the financial condition of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* indicates a condition similar to that of last year. The income and

expenses, not including the item for depreciation, are nearly equal. Income, \$44,836.02; expenses, \$43,784.45; profit, \$1,041.57. On the same basis of reckoning, last year the showing was \$148.32. But collections have been slower this year; so the cash income has not been quite equal to that of last year. The accounts receivable were \$7,641.73; now they are \$9,592.18, in round numbers, a difference of \$2,000—an amount sufficient to have cared for the accounts payable. Special effort should be made to collect \$1,195.00 interest due.

Our immediate concern is the year ahead. The perilous condition of our *Advocate* family, the reduced income for subscriptions and advertising, the advance in prices for material and labor, along with the reduced hours under the NRA, call for co-operation on the part of all if we are to continue to issue a paper such as we so much need in North Carolina. Individuals, boards and institutions of our church must turn all job work possible to our shop, and a united and continuous effort be made to circulate the *Advocate*. Pastors, the superannuates, widows, shut-ins, on the recommendation of pastors, get the paper free. This entails a cost of approximately \$3,000. In the last five years advertising has dropped from \$12,193.03 to \$3,027.74 this year. Even with the drastic economies made, the situation calls for united action.

Men of thought and discrimination say the *Advocate* has come to be more than a church organ, that it is a positive social, moral and religious force in the life of the state. If we, as a church, expect to be a real force in the life of our people, the output of the printing press cannot be neglected. This costs money, sweat and blood.

A Congregational minister, writing from Massachusetts to congratulate the *Advocate* on the recent victory won in the state for prohibition, says: "North Carolina, I hope, will long cherish this service and support your paper loyally. The people of your state have something worth supporting, something worth getting back of powerfully. Religious journalism must go forward unhampered, unafraid, in these critical days. Sacrifice anything to keep these organs of faith vigorous and great in their outreach."

In this connection, we wish to express our sincere appreciation to the editors of the *Advocate* for their admirable and vigorous policy with regard to the liquor question in our state. We are convinced that they played a most important part in bringing about the decisive and honorable victory with regard to temperance and the organized liquor traffic of recent date. We sincerely and enthusiastically recommend that all our people stand solidly behind the *Advocate* and all other agencies which contribute to the abolishing of the liquor business.

In order that the usefulness of this Conference organ may not be impaired, we insist with all possible emphasis that everybody who owes the *Advocate* make an immediate effort to pay the bill, though it be small; and that every individual, board and institution, such as our colleges, turn all possible business toward our print shop. The pastors must show increased diligence in securing renewals and new subscriptions if our paper is to keep going in these difficult times.

In conclusion, we recommend the re-appointment of Dr. M. T. Plyler as editor of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* for the ensuing year.

REPORT OF BOARD OF TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

War is one of the most destructive enemies of the human race. We commend our Federal Government for all of its efforts to promote a better understanding among the nations of the earth; and we petition the President and the Congress of the United States that they not only co-operate with, but initiate further plans and policies that will help to remove self interest from the dealings between the nations and help, thereby, to promote international friendship and good will.

INTER-RACIAL RELATIONS

The welfare of our state is aided by the advancement of friendly relationship between the races. We urge our people to co-operate with and support every plan that might be inaugurated to promote and secure a more sympathetic understanding between the white and colored races.

THE HOME

The home is one of the most vital institutions in our society. Unfortunately, it appears that our regard for this vital institution is declining. Recent legislation affecting marriage and divorce reflect our diminished regard for the sanctity of marriage and the value of the home. This trend in present-day life is unfortunate; it is a menace to society; it is a detriment to our children; and it is a challenge to the Church of God. The homes of the wealthy, with their overprivileged children, are in equal, if not greater peril, than the homes of the humblest with their underprivileged children. The best interests of our children and the security of society demand the preservation of the home as a sacred institution. The diminished regard for the home is the evidence of an unfortunate trend in the moral and spiritual standards of the people; and the surest remedy for this laxity in conduct and in standards is the acceptance of the ideals of the Church of God. The gospel of right living must be preached with a conviction and consecration that will make it effective in the lives of the people.

SPECULATION AND GAMBLING

Gambling is one of the most destructive vices that exists. Gambling results from the abnormal desire to gain something for nothing; it is an expression of selfishness; and the surest remedy against such a vice is the acceptance of the ideals and principles of Jesus.

POVERTY AND HUMAN MISERY

One of the severest indictments against the social order of this day is the existence of dire poverty and distress. The extremes in poverty and wealth constitute irrefutable evidence of the error existing in our economic and social order. Crushing debt burdens with their heavy interest requirements and other inequitable exactions of capital help explain the unemployment, decreased purchasing power and the business depression that we have suffered. It is not only the duty of our people to respond generously to provide relief from hunger and other physical privations, but we must realize that our economic and social ideas must be reformed and re-made to provide and guarantee a more equitable distribution of the benefits and the products of industry and labor. The demand for a new deal in our economic, industrial and social life constitutes one of the most pressing challenges of the Church of God. Only the acceptance and the practice of

the principles of love and unselfishness can cure the economic and social ills of the present day; and the achievement of this goal constitutes both the opportunity and the responsibility of the Church of God.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES

Alcohol is one of the most destructive enemies of the human race. The liquor traffic has caused more misery, poverty, unhappiness and deaths than all of the wars of all times. It is universally admitted in America that the liquor traffic is harmful to society. However, there is division of opinion relative to the handling of this evil. Unfortunately, for selfish reasons, there are those who favor the unrestricted manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages. However, all right-thinking people prefer that the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors be restricted in some manner. Some believe that the problem can be solved best by some form of legal control. However, we believe that the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages should be prohibited by law. No system of control has ever been devised that could eliminate the evil influences and the destructive effects of the liquor traffic. We are convinced that prohibition is the only safe and sane plan for combatting this destructive enemy of the home, the church and society. Though prohibition has never had a fair trial in America, yet it has unquestionably reduced drinking and drunkenness and diminished all of the evils and harmful influences involved in the liquor traffic.

Though we deplore the repeal of the 18th amendment to the Constitution of the United States and the temporary abandonment of prohibition as a national policy, yet we rejoice that on November 7th, 1933, the voters of North Carolina, by a majority of nearly 200,000, overwhelmingly re-affirmed their belief in prohibition. On November 7th, North Carolina recorded a victory for righteousness that has won for our state glory and honor. As Christians, interested in the welfare of our fellow men, we wish to express our appreciation for the tireless efforts of the splendid men and women in North Carolina who worked faithfully to prevent our state from putting her stamp of approval on the liquor traffic. In our efforts to save our state from the destructive clutches of legalized liquor, we had Divine guidance and support; and, for this great victory for righteousness and humanity, we humbly give God the glory and the praise.

However, it would not be wise for us to close our eyes to the unfinished task that lies before us today. In the midst of our rejoicings, we must admit frankly that conditions are not ideal. Eternal vigilance and work must be the price of improvement and progress. In spite of the beneficial results of prohibition, a certain amount of whiskey is still being manufactured and sold; and we must co-operate in the development of a public spirit and sentiment that will result in the enforcement of the prohibition laws. The eyes of the world are fixed upon North Carolina today; some of these eyes are critical; the cause of law enforcement is on trial in our state today; the forces for righteousness cannot rest idly upon recent laurels; the benefits of the recent election must be conserved; we must continue vigorously the fight to see that our prohibition laws be observed and enforced. The victory won on November 7th imposes upon us the responsibility to carry on and to demonstrate the efficacy of prohibition.

Though we must not relent in our efforts to preserve and enforce the laws against the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages, yet we must realize that temperance is the ultimate goal and that ultimately temperance cannot rely solely upon statutory enactments. Like other virtues, temperance must evolve ultimately from right thinking and right action on the part of the individual. One great humanitarian has said that temperance is total abstinence from all that is harmful and evil. Men must learn that alcoholic beverages are harmful and dangerous; our ministers must preach against the evils of intemperance; and

professing Christians must practice total abstinence from the use of alcoholic beverages. Our church members must realize that whenever they indulge in the use of alcohol as a beverage, they are lending their influence to discredit and destroy prohibition and they are helping to support and sustain the liquor traffic, one of the most destructive enemies of man and society. And we appeal to all those who are interested in their fellow men that they refrain entirely from the use of alcohol as a beverage and that they give themselves unselfishly to the support of prohibition and to the achievement of temperance.

We, therefore, ask that each preacher contribute to this cause a sum equal to at least one-half of one per cent of his salary.

We request the Bishop to appoint Rev. T. M. Grant Conference Director of Superannuate Endowment, and ask that he be given the hearty co-operation of every member of the Conference, and that each Presiding Elder provide in his District Conference program an opportunity for him or his representative to present this cause.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Your Conference Board of Lay Activities submits its annual report embodying suggestions and recommendations as follows:

SPIRITUAL LIFE

The spirit of uncertainty which prevails in our economic and social affairs demands that the cultivation of the spiritual life be made central and foremost in all our activities.

The deepening of this spiritual life and its extension throughout our church can only come when layman and preacher alike seek for a closer walk with God and the enrichment of personal experience through more intimate fellowship with Jesus Christ; when the members of our church, as a whole, have a clearer sense of their obligation to attend upon the worship services of the church; when they live a life consistent with the ideals and principles that they profess; and when they let their light so shine, as witnesses of the truth, that men shall see their good works and be led into the path of righteous living.

With the deepening of our spiritual life inevitably comes a consciousness that all we are and have is a trust from Almighty God to be used for our highest good, for the blessing of our fellow men, and for the advancement of God's kingdom throughout the earth. The fulfillment of this ideal is in essence the

practice of Christian stewardship, and to the end that our people may be trained in its principles, we recommend: (1) that each lay leader read at least one approved book on stewardship this year; (2) that our laymen avail themselves of the opportunity to take the stewardship units in a Standard training school; and (3) that the minister of each church be requested to preach on this subject during the Conference year.

OBJECTIVES

There are certain definite objectives in our church program, the attainment of which depends upon the enrichment of our spiritual life. These are:

1. To see that 100% of the membership of the church make a financial contribution to the work of the kingdom. This we feel can only be done by means of the every-member canvass.

2. To secure the payment of benevolences in full. Bishop Arthur J. Moore has been asked by the College of Bishops to lead the forces of our church during the coming year in an effort to secure payment of all benevolences. Bishop Moore has sent through the General Secretary and the Chairman of the General Board of Lay Activities a definite request that the General board and all Conference boards give him full co-operation in this effort to raise the benevolences. Our Conference board hereby goes on record as endorsing this movement and we pledge to Bishop Moore our whole-hearted co-operation and support under his leadership.

3. To send the *Methodist Layman* to each pastor in the Conference and to wage a vigorous campaign through the Conference to secure at least five subscriptions from each charge.

4. To observe Layman's Day and Loyalty Week in every charge in the Conference.

INSTITUTE FOR TRAINING CHURCH OFFICERS

We wish to commend most highly the General Secretary of the General Board of Lay Activities and his associate Secretary for their valuable service in the conduct of Institutes for Training Church Officers. It is a well known fact that many of our church officers are not fully informed of the program of our church and the causes which derive their support from it. Therefore, we urgently recommend that the lay leader of each district arrange with the General Secretary for the holding of an Institute for Training Church Officers as early in the new year as possible.

THE BUDGET

We have found that in many of our churches where the budget system is adopted, the principles of the budget system are not fully practiced. The budget is intended to include all General, Conference, and local obligations. In many cases the funds collected are not distributed proportionately. Therefore, we wish to recommend that the budget system be used wherever it is feasible and that all funds collected according to this system be distributed proportionately among the causes it represents.

OFFICERS

We nominate W. P. Few for Conference lay leader, W. K. Greene for associate Conference lay leader, and F. S. Aldridge for Secretary-Treasurer of the board. We also recommend that the above officers, together with B. W. O'Neal, of Durham, and A. M. Noble, of Smithfield, constitute the Executive Committee of the board for the ensuing year.

REPORT OF BIBLE SOCIETY BOARD

Through the efforts of the American Bible Society and other agencies, the Bible, as a whole, or in part, has been translated in 933 different languages and dialects. It is still the Book of books and the world's best seller. In spite of a world depression, the Bible has had an increased circulation throughout many lands.

It is the policy of the American Bible Society to publish and sell at cost. A new series of self-pronouncing Bibles, in bold-face type, can be had at twenty-five and fifty cents. Copies of the New Testament are five cents each.

The American Bible Society looks to the churches of America for support. Your board recommends that we heartily endorse their efforts to circulate the Scriptures, and that we continue our hearty co-operation and loyal support.

REPORT OF HOSPITAL BOARD

Your Hospital Board submits the following report:

The twelfth annual report of the General Secretary indicates that eleven of our twelve Methodist hospitals are operating successfully in spite of shaken business conditions. The total income from our church to this cause was \$27,000.

The returns in our own Conference this year will be double those of last, which reached the low mark of \$84.00. The Western North Carolina Conference contributed \$2,165; the North Georgia Conference, \$9,500. The Duke Hospital, whose activities are within our own Conference, examined and treated 32,000 patients under the unit system, over 200 per day, through the public clinic. These came from 86 counties in North Carolina and from fourteen other states, rendering invaluable service in the study and treatment of diseases, especially in the earlier stages with progress toward prevention as well as cure. Our church contributed less than one-half of one per cent to defraying the expense of the cost of the nursing and care of the 67,000 patient-days of care. What the church pays goes directly to the needy and not to Duke.

No period in the nation's history and no pressing demand offers a greater challenge to our church than this public service of a merciful ministry of healing.

The General Conference board was made trustee of a fund of \$22,000 for the treatment of the needy blind of Arizona. Other lesser funds, gifts of charitably minded benefactors, have been given to other Conferences. Our own Conference has, in a few instances, set up funds administered by local boards for the care of those of their own community. We recommend this to others, and we earnestly appeal for a fuller observance of our Lord's command to go heal. We need first to sell the ministry of healing to our own ministers, that they may carry the burden of your board to the heart of the membership of our great church. We urge a more general observance of the Golden Cross enrollment during the ensuing year.

REPORT OF ORPHANAGE COMMITTEE

Today, as always, the orphanage is dear to the hearts of our people. No cause appeals to our people more or is more readily contributed to. We need only to give the facts to the members of the North Carolina Conference of its great needs and then not let them forget to give.

We are pleased with the report our Superintendent brings to this Conference, especially so concerning the physical and spiritual condition of our boys and girls, and the earnest and consecrated effort put forth by the efficient staff now at the orphanage.

The following facts we wish to submit to the Conference:

At the close of the Conference year we had 300 children enrolled.

There are on file in the Superintendent's office 150 applications for admission of dependent children into the Methodist Orphanage.

During the present Conference year we have done extensive repairs on six of our cottages at a total cost of \$2,755.00.

From the Octagon Soap Company we have received \$2,980.00.

Several other buildings on the orphanage campus need repairs.

Practically all the buildings on the campus are badly in need of additional furniture and equipment, since most of it has been in use for many years.

We have replaced twenty double beds with single beds, which was made possible by the Edwin Gould Foundation.

Our capacity in the different cottages is being decreased by reason of the fact that we are putting in single beds.

According to the Duke Endowment report, the average per capita cost per annum for the fourteen largest orphanages in the two Carolinas is \$268.50 for the year 1932. The average per capita cost per annum for the Methodist Orphanage for the year 1932, according to the Duke Endowment report, was \$194.58.

The above per capita cost per annum shows that we are spending \$73.82 less per child than the average cost of the other thirteen largest orphanages in the two Carolinas.

Our orphanage has its own Sunday school, which meets every Sunday afternoon, and our young people have two Epworth Leagues that meet every Sunday night. Each Sunday morning our children and official staff attend services at Jenkins Memorial Methodist Church.

Our singing class has visited many churches during the year, particularly on Sundays, and given sacred concerts to the edification of all whose privilege it was to attend the services. It is a source of deep regret to the Superintendent that he cannot answer all the demands that are made upon the class to give sacred concerts in scores of other churches. These concerts have been given not with a view of taking special collections, but to demonstrate the work of the orphanage and thus deepen the interest of the people in the work which we are doing.

The Superintendent has been busy visiting many of the churches throughout the Conference during the year, as well as giving much attention to the details of the administrative side of his work.

The latter part of the summer it became necessary to borrow \$11,000 to meet the operating expenses till Conference. This indebtedness is expected to be paid at the close of the present Conference. Your attention is called to the fact that for nineteen years our orphanage has not closed the fiscal year, which ends May 31, in debt.

The health of the children during the present year has been very good, with the exception of a few hospital cases, which have been successfully treated.

The religious life of the home has received special attention by the entire official staff, with the assistance of Reverend Robert W. Bradshaw, the pastor.

Beginning December 1, 1932, the salaries of officials were further reduced. The Superintendent changed his salary from \$3,600 to \$3,000, and his salary is now \$3,000.

We want to urge all the pastors and Sunday school superintendents to take a Thanksgiving offering in every church and Sunday school during the Thanksgiving season, and we ask that this time be made to include the month of December, following the Conference.

We recommend that the orphanage apportionment be an amount equal to 10% of the pastor's salary for the ensuing year, 1933 and 1934.

We recommend the appointment of Reverend A. S. Barnes as Superintendent of the Methodist Orphanage, and Reverend C. K. Proctor as Superintendent of the Oxford Orphanage.

We recommend the election of the following as trustees to succeed themselves, their previous terms having expired: B. B. Adams, Josephus Daniels, J. C. Braswell, R. L. Flowers, Mrs. Alma Edgerton, Reverend R. W. Bradshaw.

We recommend the election of the following as trustees of the Methodist Orphanage: Dr. J. W. McGee, D. L. Cozart, Judge Thomas H. Calvert.

Have we the courage to inaugurate a confident campaign in all our churches in which we challenge men to accept Christ? Nothing but the living Christ will meet the need of this hour. There are untold numbers of persons hungry for spiritual reality, empty hearts that can only be satisfied as they are filled by the Christ. The church alone can point the confused mind and groping spirit of the world to One who takes away sin and gives peace. Let us go again to the source of Divine

Power. This means prayer, personal and corporate prayer, knocking, seeking, asking prayer—until we receive.

Definite plans for the spread of Scriptural holiness in the land are listed for our North Carolina Annual Conference as follows:

1. Personal consecration of ministers, church officials, and members.
2. Pastors' instruction classes for children and youth of the church.
3. Bible study; a Bible-centered preaching.
4. House-to-house visitation and prayer.
5. Establishment of the family altar.
6. Conference by districts and smaller groups on evangelism.
7. United religious survey of the community.
8. Church-attendance campaigns; "Go-to-church" propaganda in every community.
9. Participation in the celebrations of the Sesqui-Centennial of Methodism following the plans set by the Committee on Sesqui-Centennial Programs.
10. That each District Conference observe a Day of Prayer, presenting a spiritual-life program.

STATEMENT OF FUND

REPORT OF BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE NORTH
CAROLINA PASTORS' SCHOOL

The 1933 Pastors' School met at Duke University last June and was, in many respects, the most successful school ever conducted. Several instructors have already been lined up for the school of 1934 and there is reason to believe that the interest will be increasing.

For the first time the school co-operated with the Institute of International Relations, being held simultaneously with the sessions of the Pastors' School. This is the first time a session of the Institute of International Relations has been held in the South.

Present plans are for the Institute and the School to co-operate in their work at Duke next June.

For the benefit of preachers serving mission charges, this board has suggested scholarships, not to exceed \$10.00 each, the total amount so expended not to exceed \$200.00. Money so granted shall be expended for the payment of expenses incurred in attending the Pastors' School and shall be made available on the closing day of the School. Only those receiving two units of credit shall be considered eligible for these scholarships. The scholarships are to be awarded after consultation and in co-operation with the Presiding Elders of the two Conferences.

The Executive Committee of this board, at its meeting in July, 1933, passed the following resolution: It was moved by J. F. Kirk that we request the Board of Missions of each of the supporting Annual Conferences to increase its appro-

priation \$100.00 in view of certain scholarships to be granted to pastors working on mission charges. M. T. Plyler and J. M. Ormond were appointed to present this matter to the Board of Missions of the North Carolina Conference. H. G. Hardin and W. B. West were appointed to present the matter to the Board of Missions of the Western North Carolina Conference. This motion was carried.

It is expected that at Duke University next June an institute designed primarily for rural ministers in all the denominations in the state of North Carolina and adjacent territory will be held. It is hoped that the Pastors' School can work in co-operation with this proposed institute as it did in 1933 with the Institute of International Relations, and that the institute for rural ministers may be worked out on a scale that will justify a large attendance, and that a goodly number of instructors and speakers may be secured.

REPORT OF THE JOINT COMMISSION ON METHODIST CO-OPERATION

The Joint Commission met in the editorial office of the *Christian Advocate*, Greensboro, N. C., November 8, 1933, with members present from the three Conferences: North Carolina and Western North Carolina, M. E. Church, South, and the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church. We pass on to you the result of our deliberations:

1. We are glad to report a continuance of the spirit of fraternity and co-operation between the two denominations represented in this Commission, a spirit that is being manifested in many ways. Perhaps the greatest help to a development of this fraternal feeling is coming through the Training Schools for Christian Workers which have in them great possibilities for co-operative effort. We suggest that, wherever it is possible, joint schools be arranged to be taught by accredited teachers from both denominations.

The General Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal and the Methodist Protestant Churches, meeting last May, adopted the following recommendation growing out of the report of the Commissions on Church Union: "We unite in recommending the creation or continuation of Commissions authorized to begin at once after May, 1934, definite efforts on the part of the three Commissions to make and agree upon plans for the union of the three churches, and others that may enter upon the negotiations."

To that end your Joint Commission on Methodist Co-operation memorializes the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, meeting in May, 1934, at Jackson, Miss., the working out of a ten-year plan, similar to that which led to the reunion of British Methodism, to begin with the celebration of the Christmas Conference and ending with the centennial of the organization of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in 1944, looking toward the reunion of American Methodism at that date.

We recommend that in so far as possible our churches unite in the celebration of the Sesqui-Centennial of American Methodism, the plans for the same to be worked out by the three Commissions to be set up by the Annual Conferences this fall. We cordially invite the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church to join with us in this celebration. The Joint Commission suggests that the paper presented to our meeting by Dr. P. N. Garber be made the basis.

Following our usual agreement that the terms of two members of the Joint Commission, representing each of the denominations, shall expire each year, we recommend that the matter of electing their successors be left to the Conferences concerned.

5. That the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* be asked to give as much space as possible to materials bearing on this topic.

6. That the Board of Christian Education be asked to co-operate in the celebration by the stressing of courses in Methodism in Standard Cokesbury Training Schools, and in the circulating of Methodist literature.

7. That this committee co-operate with the Joint Commission of the Sesqui-Centennial of American Methodism; this Commission being composed of representatives of the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Protestant Church; the said Commission having since 1930 been engaged in making plans for the proper national celebration of this historic event.

8. That the present committee, with the addition of the Presiding Elders, be instructed to give assistance to the local celebrations by preparing pageants, and by furnishing literature and speakers.

ROBAH FIDUS BUMPAS

By N. H. D. Wilson

For sixty-two years the name of Robah F. Bumpas has been on the roll of the North Carolina Conference, and for thirteen years it has stood at the head of the list. Having known him intimately from my earliest childhood, I can say without hesitancy that I do not believe that in all those years he has done a deed, spoken a word, or harbored a thought which would sully the honor of that illustrious roll. But that by a long life of singular purity, piety and consecration he has added continuously to its glory.

On both his paternal and maternal sides, Brother Bumpas could trace a long and honorable lineage. Indeed in an outline of his life found among his papers, he says: "From the data obtained abroad the subject of this sketch traces ancestry back past middle ages. His lineal ancestors for centuries bore sway in England, Scotland, France, Spain."

His father, Rev. Sidney D. Bumpas, was a member of the conference fourteen years, 1837-51. He rose in those years rapidly, serving leading stations and districts. When he died, at the Salisbury conference in 1851, he had served one year on the Danville District, at that time in the North Carolina Conference. In connection with his district work he had planned to publish a religious paper, which he thought much needed, "The Weekly Messenger." The mother, Mrs. Frances Webb Bumpas, was bereaved of her oldest son and her husband in one week and left with three young children, Robah an infant, in their newly established home in Greensboro. She took up her task bravely. She edited and published the "Weekly Messenger" until it was no longer needed (1872) and in connection with her daughter, Miss Eugenia, carried on a school for children in her home. In addition to her great service as editor and teacher, and her work in the home church and community, she was from the organization of the Woman's Missionary Society until her death the Conference Corresponding Secretary. By her faith and fidelity in her ever increasing field of service she made "Aunt Bumpas" the synonym for saintliness throughout the connection.

Brother Bumpas was born in Greensboro, N. C., April 17, 1850. With such heredity, with the memory of such a father, with the guidance of such a mother, in a home whose necessary simple living was made to lead to high thinking, his boyhood was most promising. But just as he was ready to enter college he became an invalid. "Four years I walked on crutches when I walked at all, for at times I could not turn in bed and was fed with a spoon," he records. "One glorious summer afternoon I sat in a chair under an apple tree in the back yard, Bible in hand. I chanced upon that account of the healing of the cripple at the beautiful gate of the temple, and I thought, this occurred after Christ went back to heaven, and if he could heal a cripple then, surely he can heal me; and he gave me strength to walk into the house and later to West Market prayer meeting, although I was unaware that my

mother followed at some distance with my crutches, which she hid behind the door of the prayer-room, thinking that I would require them to get home. But I was through with them. God had healed and called me to preach his Word. For 54 years I had this inestimable privilege, witnessing the salvation of thousands, and then one day he came into my little back room at the Harrington's on Park street, and the same voice that told me to preach said: 'My son, you may rest now. You have done enough.' He lifted from my shoulders the great burden of responsibility which I had borne through life and filled my soul with unutterable glory, and I have no desire to preach again. My public work is finished."

Joining the North Carolina Conference at Charlotte in 1871, he gave fifty-three years of active service, forty-five as pastor and eight as presiding elder. His appointments were: 1871, Cumberland Circuit; 1872, Magnolia; 1873, Warrenton; 1874, junior on Davidson Circuit; 1875, Wentworth; 1876-7, Alamance; 1878-9, Ruthersfordton; 1880-82, Person Street, Raleigh; 1883-86, Randleman; 1887-8, Concord; 1889-90, Main Street, Durham; 1891, Oxford; 1892-95, Beaufort; 1896-7, Tarboro; 1898-9, Wilmington District; 1900-1902, Centenary, New Bern; 1903-1906, Edenton Street, Raleigh; 1907-10, New Bern District; 1911-12, Warrenton District; 1913-16, Laurinburg; 1917-20, Beaufort; 1921, Franklinton; 1922-23, Epworth, Raleigh; 1924, superannuated.

He succeeded well on district work, but his heart was in the pastorate. While on his first district, he "hungered for the pastorate." He told me that the pastorate with its immediate responsibility for souls was the most important work of the church. He served on nearly all the important boards and committees of the conference, being six years president of the Board of Missions. He built churches, he preached great sermons, he wrote beautifully; but to him the winning and the nurture of souls was the supreme task and privilege of his calling.

Denied a college education he was by no means uneducated. Even when bound to his chair as an invalid he pursued his studies. Throughout a busy life he sought diligently to cure his conscious defect. He read much and carefully. He took Chautauqua courses and attended its meetings. He traveled widely. He searched the heavens with his telescope and the world of little things with his microscope. No college gave him a diploma, but without question he became one of the most truly educated men among us. He gave his valuable telescope, his microscope and about 700 volumes of scientific and religious books to Greensboro College for Women, in memory of his sister, Miss Eugenia Bumpas, who was for years a teacher in that institution. An instance which showed his practical alertness, his loyalty to his church and its institutions, and his wisdom and skill as a pastor, was his connection with the removal of Trinity College to Durham. He was at that time Mr. Washington Duke's pastor. When he learned that it was planned to carry Trinity College to a center of population, he had a vision of what it might mean to his city, his church, to the college and to the Duke family. He brought the matter to Mr. Duke's attention and

presented it so wisely that Mr. Duke was convinced and took the steps which brought Trinity College to Durham and led it eventually to become Duke University.

Combining the vision of a mystic with the eager search after truth of a scientist, a constant student of our language and literature, wielding the pen of a ready writer, aflame with love for souls, armed with a faith which did not shrink though pressed by every foe, willing to spend and be spent to the uttermost, his was a glorious ministry.

His family life was a blending of perfect felicity and stark disappointment. His wife, Miss Selina Baynes, a distant cousin, whom he married December, 1874, was everything he could ask or expect. Six children came to them. But four died in infancy. Robah F., Jr., died when twenty-one years old. And the last, a daughter, Jessie, also when just twenty-one, died while he was in the Holy Land. He did not know that she was dead until he reached New York. But on his return voyage he had a vision. He writes, "All I had ever heard or seen, all music and song, all beauty and glory and splendor, all the works of men, and all the works of God, are as nothing to the harmony and beauty, the glory and splendor of that moment. It was enough. I was prepared for that awaited me." But the heavier blow was just ahead of him. His noble and beloved wife, under the strain of years and sorrows and increasing ill health, became a child again. His devotion to her was beautiful. He nursed her with the tenderness of a mother. When she left him, he was stricken and lonely, but with courage and faith he carried on. For some years after God had granted him a discharge from his task and his church had given him honorable release from active service, he lived in his childhood home in Greensboro with his niece, Miss Allah Troy, daughter of his sister Ella and Rev. R. P. Troy. She with her brothers and sisters are his surviving relatives. He was happy in Greensboro. Indeed he told one of his nieces at that time that it was the happiest time of his life. But he was still eager to visit new places and learn new things. From childhood he had dreamed of California. So he went. He bought a return ticket, but he did not return. California was his Beulah Land. He was radiantly happy there. In one letter telling of his skilled and kindly nurse, he wrote, "You know that I am an invalid—require constant attention—but this climate, this nurse, it is a slice of heaven." In another letter he said, "Could a few hours be added to each day, a few days to each week, a few weeks to each month, a few months to each year, I should be short of time for the work I have to do. There is never a day when I fail to find some new thing in my Bible, never an hour my heart is not sheltered in the secret of His presence." (*Advocate*, June 4, 1932). To a niece he wrote, "I never expect to move again until I go to heaven. And I do not want my body shot full of poison and hauled over the country then. I believe in the resurrection of the body. I wish to be buried in the land of my adoption with my face to the sunset sea. Before my body could be taken home—in a moment, in the twink-

ling of an eye—I shall be with my mother and your mother, with my wife, Sis Gena, and the children.” His wish was obeyed as was his further request that his funeral should be simple with nothing which did not come from the Bible and the Methodist Hymnal. He passed beyond the sunset’s radiant glow, Sunday, August 27, 1933, at Los Angeles, California, and his body rests there waiting its summons to arise.

During his last years his pen was very busy. He wrote long letters to his relatives and frequently shorter ones to us all through the North Carolina Christian Advocate. And such letters! And to the end such breadth of interest in every kind of thing! such radiant joy in living! and such victory in the contemplation of death near at hand! I would gladly quote many things from his pen as I would gladly write much more in testimony of my love and admiration for him, my elder colleague, who was from my infancy, in all things except blood, my brother; but I must hold my hand. However, I know no more fitting close for this memoir, none which would more eloquently survey his life and declare his character, than to reproduce here that triumphant and beautiful prose poem which he published in the Advocate of April 5, 1928, “There Are No Shadows”:

“It seems so pathetic to be nearing sixty, in poor health, and be entirely alone.’ Extract from a private letter.

“Yes, indeed, life is pathetic: surely mine has been so. When I was an infant my father passed away, and I never enjoyed the benefit of his protection and guidance. My mother was left a widow, having three little children to support by the use of her pen. We practiced economy and self-denial.

“When a lad I was crippled, deprived of sports so dear to youth; a shut-in and much alone. I was prepared for college, my trunk packed and my room engaged, but ill health kept me away. When a young man, contrary to my inclinations, I was thrust out into public life. Shrinking, painfully diffident, I appeared before an audience with fear and trembling. My health was delicate, salaries meager, often we did without.

“To the inexperienced itinerant there are difficulties to encounter, trials to endure, steep mountains to scale, enemies to face, fierce battles to fight. It was no primrose path, but called for red blood.

“One by one our children took wings; at last my chosen companion departed, leaving me all alone in the world, and it seemed as if my very life had dropped out of me. Then I was placed on the shelf.

“Truly a pathetic story, do you say?

“And yet from my mother I inherited a ray of sunshine. It fell upon the grass and flowers as I played in the yard; it illumined the dark wood where I strolled as a boy; it fell upon the pillows of my couch, the floor, the carpet, the open book from which

I read; it lit up the faces of my friends, and when I entered the pulpit it illumined the sacred pages with a divine glory.

"And the people, O the people, how generous were they in the thought of us—how they welcomed us into their homes, and to the very best they had, and what a wealth of love they poured upon us. We were just the folks they wanted, and they made us very, very happy.

"Our home was a little love nest, a thing of beauty and a joy forever, a shelter and a place of refuge. If we had to count the pennies, there was never a debt. When the blinds were closed and the shades pulled down there was light within. When I walked through the valley, there was no shadow, for Jesus was there.

"And now as the evening time draws on, I am in sunny Southern California. There are no shadows as I face the sunset, and when I turn and look back, the whole landscape, mountain, hill and plain, is flooded with its glory. There is not a single regret, my mistakes and failures are covered by the blood, my sins are all blotted out. When I look forward there is a shining bridge of gold thrown over the blue waves of the Pacific, touching the sands at my feet; the angels traverse it, going and coming. There are no shadows."

Mrs. Daisy Speight Barnes was the daughter of W. H. and Mrs. Bobbie Speight. She was born October 5, 1870, and died June 22, 1933.

In her early young womanhood she was married to Rev. A. S. Barnes. To them were born three children, Albert, Speight, and Maude. Albert died soon after finishing college.

This young couple took its place in the North Carolina Conference and labored in such a way that the people whom they served were always devoted to their pastor's wife as well as appreciative of their pastor. It was good, hard, honest work they gave, because they loved much and rejoiced in doing the Master's work.

When the orphanage needed a man and his wife to carry on its work, the trustees very wisely selected them. These years at the Orphanage, where much of her married life was spent, were full of the kind of service that only love can render.

Mrs. Barnes was fortunate in all of her relations, especially the ones that help to make a true and beautiful life. In the early home life there were culture and grace. Here it was that the abiding qualities of her experiences took root and later grew with the years of added wisdom and goodness. Her childhood friends were very dear to her and as her circle of friends increased with the years, her capacity for enjoying them seemed to grow and become a trait of her character. Indeed all of her experiences were begun

and ended with such a forceful personality, that apparently there were no storms in the great depth of her soul. Steadily she grew in grace and in the knowledge of her Lord, until all of the tasks were beautifully balanced and were then translated into a mature Christian character.

Her temperament was artistic. This was seen in the appointments of her home. In her choice of books. In her love of nature. And expressed itself in her beautiful paintings, some of which adorn the walls of Duke University.

The social life of her city, her home, her church, the orphaned child were enriched by her love and devotion.

In going she might have said with Mrs. Ramsey McDonald: "I have always been ready to go. Let us praise God together for what has been. He has been very good to me in giving me my work, my friends, and my faith. At the end of the day I go gladly to him for rest and shelter. I will hold your hand until those who have gone before give me greeting."

The North Carolina Conference was set off from the Virginia Conference in May, 1836, and in 1850, and again in 1870, North Carolina territory in the South Carolina Conference was transferred to this Conference. In 1890 North Carolina territory in the Holston Conference and in the Virginia Conference, except that beyond the Chowan River, was transferred to the North Carolina Conference, and the Conference was divided into the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. In 1894 the remaining North Carolina territory in the Virginia Conference was transferred to the North Carolina Conference.
