REPORT OF BOARD OF MISSIONS

The Board of Missions of the North Carolina Conference rejoices in the fine spirit of co-operation that has prevailed in the payment of the benevolent acceptances, and in the general spirit of evangelism throughout the Conference. There is a spirit of hopefulness that assures the forward movement of the whole missionary program.

The General Board of Missions is solicitous in sending new workers to the field and is anxious for the strong churches of the Conference, or the districts to undertake sending out such representative workers.

The General Missionary Council will be held at Washington, January 7th to 9th, 1936. The proximity of this Council offers an excellent opportunity to many of our laymen and ministers to attend. An instructive and inspiring program has been arranged. Proper credentials will be granted to those who indicate their purpose to attend if they will communicate with F. S. Love, Conference Missionary Secretary.

The District Missionary Institutes are planned to be held immediately following the General Council. The dates assigned to the North Carolina Conference are January 9th to 24th. It is the desire of your board that Dr. A. W. Wasson be assigned to speak at these institutes.

The *World Outlook* has worthily won the support of all our missionary agencies. It is a missionary magazine presenting a world view of the Christian message and opportunity. Your board recommends that the work of this paper be presented to the congregation Sunday, February 16th.

We recommend the continuance of the Rural Work Committee auxiliary to the General Rural Work Committee, and that the Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Christian Education be named in the place of L. L. Gobbel as a member of the committee.

We recommend the continuance of the Committee on Conference Evangelism, and Conference Missionary Work and that these two agencies continue their aggressive and effective work.

REPORT NO. 1—BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

I

Your board is mindful of the continued co-operation and assistance given by our General Board of Christian Education and desires to make grateful acknowledgment.

We would record our gratitude for the progress made during the year and recognize the contribution of each one who has helped to make it possible. Among these we would mention our Conference staff, presiding elders, pastors, district workers, local church officers and teachers, Louisburg College, Duke University, and the Duke Endowment, which furnished us the services of five full-time workers during the summer months.

After fourteen years of effective service as Executive Secretary, Dr. L. L. Gobbel resigned in April of this year to become President of Greensboro College. Dr. Gobbel's contribution to the cause of Christian education in the North Caro-

lina Conference cannot be estimated in words or figures. We rejoice with him in all that his new field of service offers to him.

Upon the resignation of our Executive Secretary, the Executive Committee of our board requested Professor H. E. Spence, President of the board, to supervise the work of the board until Dr. Gobbel's successor had been named. The board desires to record its appreciation of his service.

Your board feels that it was very fortunate in having been able in June of this year to secure again the services of Mrs. Earl W. Brian, who resumes her work as Extension Secretary and Director of Young People's Work. Her previous record makes any commendation to our Conference unnecessary.

We desire to commend the work of Mrs. H. M. Wade, who has been in the employ of your board during the past year as Director of Children's Work and Extension Secretary. She has won a place among us and is doing work of a high order. We bespeak for her the co-operation of our leaders and people.

We would direct your attention to the following items:

1. One of the major emphases of the year has been that of evangelism. In each district staff meeting and sub-district institute a special time was set aside for a thorough discussion of the principles and methods of evangelism. Reports indicate that there has been a marked increase this year in the number of classes in training children for church membership.

2. With the largest advance enrollment we have ever had it was necessary at the last minute in the interest of the health of our young people to abandon our summer assembly plans for young people and intermediates. Notwithstanding this handicap, we have succeeded in going beyond our goal of \$2,500 for our Young People's Mission Special and securing the largest number of pledges for the new year that we have yet secured.

3. In the promotion of the Memphis Conference, special rallies and group meetings have been held in each district and union of the Conference. Several of the districts have filled their delegations and indications are that our Conference will have a good representation at the Memphis Conference.

4. Ninety additional church schools have joined the ranks of those remitting missionary offerings to the Treasurer of the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise. An increase of more than \$1,350 has been made in the total receipts for this cause this year. Major emphasis has been placed on the co-operative plan for missionary education of children.

5. There has been an increase in the number of Standard and Cokesbury schools and classes. More than a hundred institutes, young people's rallies, and children's workers' meetings have been held during the year.

6. While it was not possible, owing to health conditions, to hold more than sixteen per cent of the vacation schools planned, there is reason to feel that the work accomplished was constructive and far-reaching.

7. Our extension work has continued in new territory. Help has been given to the C. M. E. and A. M. E. churches, and to the Indian Methodist Episcopal Church. Surveys and follow-up work have been carried on.

8. Quarterly meetings of the district staffs have been held during the year. The work of these staffs has been most effective.

9. Special emphasis has been placed upon the work of our own colleges and universities and upon the advantages which they offer for the higher education of our young people. Our staff has assisted in the promotion of the fourth state-wide Methodist Student Conference, held at College Place Church, Greensboro, November 7-9.

10. Church School Day has been observed in approximately one-fifth of our churches. There is indication that the 1935 observance of Childhood and Youth Week has been widespread and helpful.

We present the following resolutions as adopted by this board:

For a number of years our Conference has been served by Luther L. Gobbel as Executive Secretary of the Board of Christian Education. On June 1, 1935, he left the services of the Conference to begin his new work as President of Greensboro College.

Your Board of Christian Education wishes to express to Dr. Gobbel the appreciation of the North Carolina Conference for his faithful services, and to wish him well in his new duties.

The Board of Christian Education of the North Carolina Conference desires to express the sincere appreciation of the board to Mr. K. W. Parham, of Raleigh, for his faithful service in auditing the Treasurer's books.

II

SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES

As your board looks back upon the past year, it is grateful for the progress made by our several institutions of learning. Even though there have been economic problems and hardships, student bodies have continued to increase, and effective training for Christian citizenship has been advanced.

LOUISBURG COLLEGE

With a noticeable increase in the student body from 168 to 263, under the newly inaugurated self-help plan, and with increased cash receipts, Louisburg College, now believed to be operating efficiently, meeting current expenses, is greatly encouraged. It is felt that a real need is being met by this institution, and full proof of its usefulness through real service is desired.

GREENSBORO COLLEGE

From the report of the President of the Board of Trustees, we learn that the 89th scholastic year of Greensboro College opened this fall under favorable conditions with an increased enrollment over the last four years. Dr. Luther L. Gobbel has succeeded Dr. S. B. Turrentine, who served efficiently as President of the institution from 1913 to 1935. Several new members have been added to the faculty, and improvements in physical equipment have been made. The development of Christian character in its students as expressed in life is the ultimate aim of Greensboro College. It is desired that there may be secured an increased endowment and better physical equipment. Greensboro College gives promise of increased usefulness in the future.

DUKE UNIVERSITY

Duke University has continued to grow throughout the year, and its student body is made up of representatives from almost all parts of the world.

We point with pride to certain statistical data which show something of the great service being rendered by our university. The number of students for the academic year, 1934-1935, 3,262; the number for the summer school, 1935, 1,803. There are 335 officers and teachers, not including assistants.

The present endowment is \$29,880,267.26, while the plant and equipment are valued at \$26,147,076.23.

We find that the university has 27 loan funds valued at \$1,536,024.56, twelve scholarship funds valued at \$110,344.09, and 42 miscellaneous special funds, the sum of which is \$143,483.08.

PASTORS' SCHOOL

The 1935 session of the North Carolina Pastors' School offered a most helpful program. It was well patronized with a considerable number of credits being granted.

The Institute of International Relations, which was in its third year, and the Institute for Rural Ministers, in its second year, were both quite successful.

The financial statement of our Treasurer, C. K. Proctor, and the certificate of audit of same, by K. W. Parham, C. P. A., are appended hereto.

REPORT NO. 2—BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

We submit the following recommendation as report number 2 of the Board of Christian Education:

1. That we continue emphasis upon missionary education until every church in the Conference has a share in the *regular* support of the fourth Sunday offering for the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise.

2. That each district staff work out a goal for each district in the matter of offerings for Church School Day and suggest to each church its proportionate part in this goal.

3. That we hold a larger number of one-teacher training schools throughout the Conference and emphasize three or four large schools in selected centers of the Conference, these schools to offer a larger number of specialization courses.

4. That we hold *one* district-wide Christian education conference in each district instead of a large number of sub-district institutes.

5. That we secure the accreditation of a larger number of preachers and local church workers within our own Conference for training classes and schools.

6. That we emphasize a year-round program of training for the small church instead of confining this work to the summer months.

7. That each member of the staff spend from two to four weeks in one district during the year, going with the presiding elder, or at his direction, to the various charges of the district, thus attempting to do as rapidly as possible a concentrated work in each district.

8. That we hold one Young People's Assembly and three or four intermediate camps or assemblies.

9. That the staff work closely with the Board of Managers of the Pastors' School in helping to promote this school, especially through local church school workers, and in securing several courses that will appeal especially to local church workers.

10. That we continue emphasis upon the work of the district staffs, emphasizing regular quarterly district staff meetings.

11. That we hold district-wide Vacation School Institutes, either separately or in conjunction with the district-wide Christian Education Institute. That we hold an observation Vacation School in a selected center.

12. That we emphasize parent education.

13. That we emphasize training children for church membership through wider co-operation of pastors and teachers, with a special opportunity provided for personal enrichment of teachers preceding the pre-Easter membership emphasis.

14. That we continue our promotion of the Church-wide Memphis Conference, December 27-31, 1935.

15. That we lay particular emphasis upon temperance education.

16. That we give increased attention to evangelism.

17. That we stress the widespread use of Christian literature, and of our own Methodist literature in particular. We especially commend the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

Your Board of Church Extension submits the following report:

The available funds for appropriation at this session of the Conference was the sum of \$4,000. The board could not meet the calls in the various applications which were presented for our consideration. There are a number of instances where the church is bleeding, having suffered from fire and storms. In addition there are many needy fields where the people are poor and unable to provide suitable parsonages for the preachers and suitable houses of worship for the

congregations. Our needs for larger funds and gifts to this cause are very compelling. We see no way of getting these churches off the Board of Missions until parsonages and churches are provided. It is the sense of this board that the allowance appropriated should be substantially increased, and that in the future the 10½% apportioned by the Budget Commission for church extension work should be divided according to the rule suggested by the General Conference.

We also urge our preachers to exert themselves diligently to find those in their flocks who might be willing to make donations to our loan fund, even to the extent of urging them to include a gift in their wills for this cause, thus increasing our Conference board loan fund from \$23,000 to \$50,000 in order that we may be able to offer modest loans at reasonable rates to those who are seeking to improve their churches and parsonages to the point of adequacy.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

It is a recognized fact that literature is a dominant factor in determining the character and the life of our people. We believe, therefore, that Christian literature has an ever increasing place of usefulness in the mental and spiritual life of our church. For this reason we recommend your most sympathetic indulgence in making use of the best literature possible, thereby giving it a central place in your intellectual life. Furthermore, we would urge that you enrich your home life by keeping an ample supply of the best literature coming into it. Let us, therefore, look at our source materials.

PUBLISHING HOUSE

Our own Publishing House can furnish us with the choicest literature published. With the inexhaustible supply of the best religious literature at hand there is no valid reason for any one being unsupplied. Also there is no reason for any one going outside our own publishing interests for his supplies. Our Publishing House this year shows a gain of 7 1/3 per cent. The House made a profit of \$86,270.76, which is \$20,172.29 more than the profit of a year before. The per cent of profit on sales was 5 1/2 per cent. Through the diligent efforts of the men who manage our Publishing interests, the Book Committee was able to appropriate the sum of \$75,000 to the superannuates, of which \$2,748.16 came to our own North Carolina Conference.

We earnestly recommend that our church schools, without exceptions, avail themselves of the opportunity of using the best literature possible, this at all times being carried by our Publishing House. Pastors and local boards of Christian Education should particularly supply their teachers with suitable helps such as the *Church School Magazine* and the *Elementary Teacher*.

CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE

The *Christian Advocate* is a leading journal in denominational literature. It is ably edited and is deserving of our personal interest. It keeps us informed as to the general program of the church and should by all means go into the home of every minister who in turn should urgently recommend it to the members of our churches.

THE NORTH CAROLINA CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE

According to the Auditor's report, the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* shows a net profit of \$2,658.07, which is approximately a \$500 increase over last year. Part of this increase comes through the department of commercial printing, which is heartily endorsed by your committee and we furthermore recommend your patronage.

The *Advocate* will continue its campaign for an increased circulation during the coming year. An increased circulation of our church paper is evidence of a growing interest in the spiritual and moral uplift of our people. A special effort has been made during the past year to place the *Advocate* in the homes of every official of our church. In the beginning of the year two official boards were 100% subscribers to the *Advocate*. During the year our Conference reported 74 official boards 100%. Realizing the great good accomplished by our church paper and the need that it fills in our homes we earnestly hope that this year we shall at least double our official board's subscriptions.

A few words from Bishop Kern's letter to the Board of Publication emphasizes the importance of the circulation of our church organ. They are in part: "I wish also to assure the board that I think the time has come for us to make plans for a still further increase in the number of subscribers. In this matter we have but fairly begun our work. No small portion of the credit for the excellent spirit prevailing in the two North Carolina Conferences is due to the significant increase in the number of readers of our Conference organ."

Your committee, therefore, requests the Conference to adopt the following goals for the coming year, concerning our church paper:

1. A continuous effort on the part of the preachers and laymen to make the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* a positive force in the social, educational, and the religious life of the state. For this *Advocate* is definitely committed to the uplift of all the people in North Carolina and to the coming of the kingdom in all the earth.

2. The circulation of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* is essential to our work and should be put on a level with missions, religious education, orphanages and other interests of the church.

3. The chairman of each Board of Stewards to work with the pastor in putting the *Advocate* into the home of every steward, so that the Board of Lay Activities, which is now the Board of Stewards, may become informed and the church thereby may have an intelligent leadership.

4. Make the ultimate goal for the Bishop, the presiding elders, pastors, lay leaders and missionary women the putting of the church paper in every Methodist home. This will mean a better *Advocate* and better homes and better churches. A united campaign to this end will result in full collections, and better paid ministers and missionaries. Lack of knowledge and want of fellowship with the Christ is the hurt of our people. Our redemption—the healing of this hurt—must be found in the output of the printing press and the fellowship of a spiritual ministry.

We recommend that H. C. Smith succeed himself as a member to the Methodist Board of Publication. We also request the Bishop to re-appoint M. T. Plyler as Editor of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*.

REPORT NO. 1—BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

We, the Board of Lay Activities of the North Carolina Conference, beg to present the following report:

As we take stock of what has been done in the year now closing we have just reason to rejoice. Laymen everywhere have set their hand to the plough and have not turned back. More of our people are reading our Christian literature than ever before and the principle of voluntary giving has struck a responsive chord in the hearts of men. Enthusiasm is the prevailing note and the confidence in ultimate victory abounds.

But our task has only begun, for the world about us is still sorely tainted with moral laxity and spiritual lethargy. Men and women of Christly heroism must give their lives in sacrificial service for the glory of God and the relief of man's estate. Each layman must meet the task that lies ahead with a quickened sense of personal responsibility. He must demonstrate his interest and loyalty by becoming an active working force in his local church. We appeal to every layman of the North Carolina Conference, individually, to consecrate his life afresh to the common task of building a better world.

We desire especially to emphasize, for the coming year, the opportunities and responsibilities of the local Board of Lay Activities with regard to the following: (1) Personal Evangelism; (2) Full Payment of the Benevolences; (3) The Golden Cross; (4) The Training of Official Boards; (5) The Observance of Layman's Day; (6) *The North Carolina Christian Advocate*; (7) The Methodist Orphanage.

PERSONAL EVANGELISM

We deplore the situation that reveals a social, moral, and spiritual decline in the life of our people. Realizing that the church must advance against the forces of evil, the College of Bishops and the General Conference have designated this as a Quadrennium of Evangelism, setting as a goal the winning of 750,000 new members. The ministers cannot meet this situation alone. The laymen, also, must be marshaled for this task. We, therefore, recommend:

(1) That the Church Board of Lay Activities make personal evangelism one of its chief objectives.

(2) That at the Conference-wide, or district, meeting, held under the direction of the Bishop early in the calendar year, a plan be worked out for a program of personal evangelism.

(3) That the district lay leader co-operate with the presiding elder in providing lay speakers for service not only in occupied areas but in outlying sections for the purpose of reaching all those unchurched people for whom we are responsible.

FULL PAYMENT OF BENEVOLENCES

The adoption of voluntary principle has created a wider vision and a deeper sense of loyalty on the part of laymen everywhere. It, therefore, becomes imperative to give serious attention to the problem of how best to lead our local churches to recognize and fulfill their benevolent and missionary responsibility. To this end we make the following recommendations:

(1) That the Annual Conference accept the General Conference askings for general work; and that an equal amount be apportioned for Conference work;

(2) That a mass meeting for stewards in each district be held as soon as practicable after the Annual Conference session for the purpose of information and inspiration with reference to the benevolences;

(3) That Conference-wide, or district, meetings be held under the direction of the Bishop early in the calendar year, to which all charge lay leaders be invited, to plan for one-half of the benevolences to be paid by Easter or the session of the District Conference;

(4) That a program properly emphasizing benevolences be provided by the presiding elders and district lay leaders at all District Conferences;

(5) That the Bishop call a meeting of his Cabinet and the Conference Board of Lay Activities as soon as practicable after the May meeting of the Bishops for the purpose of checking up and making plans for completing the work of the year.

THE GOLDEN CROSS

Every church school, missionary society, and Board of Lay Activities is a recruiting station for enlisting members for the Golden Cross. Members may be enrolled at any time during the Conference year, but the week, including the second and third Sundays in May, is Hospital Week. We earnestly recommend that the Board of Lay Activities of the local church lend all possible assistance to the church director in his efforts to promote the hospital work of our church.

THE TRAINING OF OFFICIAL BOARDS

We commend the effective work done by Mr. Morelock and others in conducting institutes for stewards throughout the church. If the work of the local church is to become effective, it must be directed by a leadership that takes its task seriously and seeks to become well-informed on all the vital phases of church work. We, therefore, recommend:

(1) That an institute for stewards be held in each district in which one has not already been held;

(2) That pastors be urged to discuss with Boards of Stewards important phases of the lay program. (The material for this discussion is found in Morelock's *The Board of Stewards*);

(3) That the organization of official boards include, with due allowance for variation, the following committees: Executive, Finance, Property and Grounds, Music, Social Welfare, Evangelism, Lay Speaking, Stewardship, Missionary, and Church Papers;

(4) That the district Board of Lay Activities meet as soon as possible after the Annual Conference to study the program and plan the work of the year;

(5) That a meeting of the Conference Board of Lay Activities be held as soon as is practicable after the District Conferences for the purpose of training new members and for planning the remaining work of the year;

(6) That each charge in the Conference send the chairman of the board of stewards, or some other outstanding member of the official board, as a delegate to the "Conference for Chairmen of Boards of Stewards" to be held by our General Board at Lake Junaluska, July —, 1936.

LAYMAN'S DAY

We recommend that Layman's Day be observed in every charge of the Conference on the third Sunday in May, 1936, or as near thereto as is practicable, and that the program as outlined by the General Board of Lay Activities be used on this occasion.

CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE

Laymen should be encouraged to read the *Christian Advocate* (Nashville), especially since our own *Methodist Layman* has been merged with it. It is especially desirable that it be put into the homes of all the preachers. The *North Carolina Christian Advocate* is also our organ in this Conference and in the state.

We are gratified to know that there has been a decided increase during the past year in the number of official boards that subscribed 100% for this splendid paper. We consider an acquaintance with its contents indispensable to the effective promotion of the causes of our church in this Conference and we place ourselves solidly behind its circulation, fixing as our goal a copy of this paper in the home of every Methodist steward. To circulate our Conference organ is our first consideration. Therefore, we recommend that the charge lay leader, or some one designated by him, act in co-operation with the Superintendent of Publicity of the Woman's Missionary Society (wherever such organization exists) to solicit subscriptions to the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* and that such solicitation continue until an earnest effort is made to place the *Advocate* in the home of every steward.

THE METHODIST ORPHANAGE

The Board of Lay Activities places itself solidly behind the Conference program for the Methodist Orphanage. The Orphanage needs far more than an amount equal to 10% of pastor's salaries to sustain it, since this amount does not provide a balanced budget.

We, therefore, urge our church schools and organized classes, wherever it is possible, to make monthly offerings for the support of the Orphanage. In the case of all other schools and classes we urge the giving of the fifth Sunday offering.

We further recommend that all our churches and church schools make a Thanksgiving offering for the benefit of the Orphanage.

We urgently request that no board of stewards of any church credit an Orphanage special upon its regular 10% acceptance of Conference askings for the Orphanage.

We nominate Dr. W. K. Greene as Associate Conference Lay Leader and Prof. F. S. Aldridge as Secretary and Treasurer. We further nominate the officers of the Conference Board of Lay Activities, together with Mr. A. M. Noble and Mr. A. W. Byrd as the Executive Committee of the board.

REPORT NO. 2—BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

We again warn our members, young and old, against the use of alcohol and other habit-forming drugs. In the case of so deadly a drug as alcohol, so destructive as it has proved itself of all human values, we believe that every sense of Christian temperance and Christian responsibility for the welfare of one's fellow counsels total abstinence.

We re-affirm our position that the only safe and ultimate method of dealing with the drink evil is the legal prohibition of the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages. The deplorable conditions existing in those counties of North Carolina in which the sale of hard liquors is permitted, the even more deplorable conditions in those states of our union where the wholesale and retail liquor dealers have come to the fore under the guise of "legal control," and the increased death-rate on our North Carolina highways since the "legalizing" of beer and similar so-called "light" drinks, are steadily emphasizing the impossibility of compromise with alcohol.

The brazen failure of the Federal Government to assist in the enforcement of prohibition, as was emphatically promised by high government officials and

others active in repealing the eighteenth amendment, in those states that should vote to continue prohibition, the absolute falsehood of the claims for revenue made by the advocates of repeal, and the shameful advertising in press, by radio, and in and by every other conceivable way in order to lure more young people into the clutches of alcoholic addictions are positive proofs that the church cannot compromise with alcohol or with those who desire to profit by the debauchery it inevitably produces.

We repeat the declaration adopted by this Conference last year:

"It is fundamentally wrong for an individual, or a nation, to make traffic of human vice and wretchedness. We believe that it is un-Christian for a community, a state, or a nation to seek profit through taxation or license fees from the debauchery of its citizens. We urgently recommend, therefore, that every layman of our church take a definite stand against the manufacture and sale of intoxicants and that he spare no effort in promoting the movements for the protection of the individual and society from the social, economic, and moral waste of any traffic in intoxicants and habit-forming drugs.

"We especially request that our ministers take the lead in the cause of temperance and that our members refrain from the use of intoxicants.

"We further request that in the preparation of the District Conference programs a place be given for the presentation of the cause of temperance and total abstinence from intoxicants."

We most earnestly remonstrate against any of our members seeking to share in the profits of debauchery through such actions as accepting advertisements in newspapers or other properties they may own, renting property for use as a place of sale, aiding the beer-wine-liquor traffic through accepting fees as attorneys or lobbyists, selling or aiding in the sale of intoxicants, or in any other ways aiding and abetting in "holding the bottle to their neighbor's lips."

We commend the legislature of North Carolina for its refusal, month after month, to place the state in the liquor business. We believe the members of the legislature rightly judged the wishes of the majority of the citizens of North Carolina and undoubtedly the Christian citizens of the state as being opposed to having their taxes reduced or worthy appropriations increased if the legislature had to do it by creating more drunkards in North Carolina and saddling the bill on the drunkards and their families. We deplore the fact, however, that in the rush of closing what had been a wise and praiseworthy session the legislature attempted to "legalize" the liquor business in certain counties. We urge our members in these unfortunate counties to renewed activity in undoing the evil that has been attempted.

We approve of the stand which has been taken by leaders in our Conference in refusing to appoint to official positions in the local church men who are in any way connected with the sale of intoxicating liquors.

REPORT OF ORPHANAGE COMMITTEE

The Methodists of the North Carolina Conference rejoice in the establishment of the Methodist Orphanage in Raleigh thirty-six years ago, thus adding to the program of the church a Christian response to the call of needy and destitute childhood. The record of the Orphanage through the years has been one of growth and continuous service, and through the Orphanage our church is rendering an ever increasing and more efficient Christ-like service.

In order to meet operating expenses during the fall, the Orphanage had to borrow \$6,000. This amount must be paid back at an early date. The officials of the Orphanage have practiced rigid economy in every department of the work. The Duke Endowment report for the Orphanages of the two Carolinas shows that our Methodist Orphanage has operated on a smaller per capita basis than most of the other large Orphanages of the two states.

The Orphanage apportionment is approximately \$35,000. In order to have a balanced budget we need at least \$70,000. This leaves a difference of \$35,000, which must be made up by funds from the Duke Endowment, our limited endowment and by specials. If all the churches were to pay one hundred per cent of their Orphanage apportionment we would be far from the necessary amount to meet operating expenses. These figures reveal in a striking way our need for a larger income from the Conference. We do not think it advisable at this time to ask for an increase in the ten per cent apportionment, but we want to ask and urge the Conference to raise a large special to supplement the limited apportionment.

Since the Orphanage has such limited resources at its command, we want to urge churches, church schools, organized classes and friends to take Thanksgiving offerings for the Orphanage during the next month. Wherever it is possible to let these offerings go as specials and not on the apportionment, but churches that are not in a position to let such offerings go as specials may apply these offerings on their ten per cent apportionment.

The Methodist Orphanage wishes to withdraw its request for monthly offerings from church schools, and ask for fifth Sunday offerings, with the hope and belief that the whole Conference will unite in urging every church school in the Conference to set aside the fifth Sunday offerings to go as specials. We would also urge that the pastors of all the churches take a free-will offering on fifth Sundays for the Orphanage and, wherever practicable, apply it on specials, and not on the ten per cent Orphanage apportionment.

It is perfectly obvious from the foregoing statements that the Orphanage needs a large endowment in order to fulfill its mission to the Orphanage children of the Conference. This can be accomplished by friends writing the Orphanage in their wills, by making the Orphanage the beneficiary of insurance policies, and by securing Methodist Orphanage annuity bonds, which pay a high rate of interest.

It is highly gratifying to state to the Conference that our invested funds are well protected by good securities. It is believed by the Board of Trustees that when all the funds we have loaned out are liquidated, we will realize one hundred cents on every dollar thus invested.

In order to repair three of the buildings, and to furnish and add new furniture to several others, we have inaugurated an Octagon Soap campaign to secure the necessary funds for this purpose. If all our churches will co-operate with us in this undertaking we can accomplish this end without anybody being called upon for financial help. We cannot afford to take out of our limited operating fund money for this purpose. A few years ago we raised \$3,500 from a similar campaign, and we want to raise at least that much during the next few months.

If all our pastors will call the attention of their churches to this plan, we can go over the top in a most successful way.

Our school is being operated in a highly satisfactory manner. We have an exceptionally fine staff of teachers who, by example and precept, are inculcating in the lives of the children the highest standards of Christian conduct and living. What has been said in reference to the teachers is equally true with reference to the cottage mothers and all other members of the Orphanage staff.

Practically all the children above the age of six years are members of Jenkins Memorial Church, where they attend services every Sunday morning. We have our own church school, well organized, which meets every Sunday morning at ten o'clock in the Orphanage chapel. Every Sunday afternoon we have quiet hour for meditation and the study of the Word of God. Every Sunday night our Senior and Intermediate Epworth Leagues meet and have most interesting programs, conducted by the children. Revival services in the spring, conducted by Rev. E. L. Hillman, a member of the Board of Trustees, resulted in toning up the spiritual life of the whole institution.

The Orphanage deeply regrets the fact that it had to cancel all summer engagements of the singing class, due to the prevalence of infantile paralysis. We wish to thank the pastors and churches for the many pressing invitations which have come to the class for sacred concerts. We wish the class could visit more of the churches in this way.

A deep sense of gratitude to our Heavenly Father fills our hearts because there were no cases of infantile paralysis among our children, or any other illness during the year.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted by the Orphanage Executive Committee, in which the Conference Orphanage Committee concurs: "RESOLVED, That we, the members of the Executive Committee, ask the North Carolina Conference, at its approaching session, to designate the months of December and January as the most suitable and appropriate time to call upon the churches of the Conference to make a special effort to raise the entire Orphanage apportionment for the new Conference year wherever it is practical during these two months. Since the Orphanage funds are practically exhausted, it is imperative that the pastors and churches put forth special effort to realize this objective."

We especially rejoice in the administration of Rev. A. S. Barnes, who has been Superintendent for the past twenty-one years. He has grown with the Orphanage, and in his own heart and life demonstrates the spirit of the Master as he gathered little ones unto himself. We might tabulate some of the tangible results that have been accomplished during the past twenty-one years. Seven buildings have been erected at an approximate cost of \$400,000; endowment increased from \$40,000 to \$290,000, which is a gain of a quarter of a million dollars; three educational loan funds have been established, with total \$27,000; several acres of land have been added to the campus at a cost of approximately \$15,000; a two hundred acre dairy farm has been acquired, valued at \$10,000, on which is a modern dairy barn, and a herd of more than sixty head of cattle, valued at \$18,000; Orphanage school changed from nine to eleven grades, and is housed in one of the best school buildings in the state—a gift of Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Vann, of Franklinton, N. C.; the campus has been improved and beautified; a splendid outdoor swimming pool has been built at a cost of \$5,000; the number of children increased from one hundred and seventy-five to three hundred; mother's aid has been adopted, which is a movement of far-reaching consequence, and will result in extending the influence and blessing of the Orphanage to hundreds of children, who otherwise would be overlooked or neglected. But the thing that gives us the greatest satisfaction is the fact that the Methodist Orphan-

age has been transformed from the institutional type into a school and home where uniforms, rigid rules and regulations have been relegated to the past. Children growing up in such a wholesome atmosphere are care-free and happy.

We recommend that the Orphanage apportionment be an amount equal to 10% of the pastor's salary for the Conference year, 1936, and that it remain out of the Conference budget.

We wish the Conference to re-elect the following, who have been renominated by the board, to succeed themselves on the Board of Trustees: Rev. L. S. Massey, W. Norwood Boyd, C. A. Dillon, Dr. J. W. McGee, W. A. McGirt, Mrs. E. Y. Speed, Rev. R. W. Bradshaw.

The Conference is asked to elect Miss Virginia Borden as a member of the Board of Trustees to succeed J. L. Borden, deceased.

We request the Conference to re-appoint Rev. A. S. Barnes as Superintendent of the Methodist Orphanage, whose salary for the Conference year now closing was \$3,450. We also request the appointment of Rev. C. K. Proctor as Superintendent of Oxford Orphanage.

That the Conference Treasurer also be directed to pay to the Conference Secretary \$1,400 to cover his salary, incidental expenses, and the printing of the Conference Journal; to pay to the Statistical Secretary \$200.00, and to the Conference Treasurer \$600.00 for the expense of Secretary for the Treasurer. These amounts to be paid out of the Conference funds before figuring any percentages.

The percentages for distribution to the other causes from the balance are:

The books of the Conference Treasurer were audited by A. M. Pullen and Company, certified accountants of Raleigh, N. C. The report of the audit is entered on the records of the Commission.

We recommend the re-election of Mr. C. A. Dillon, of Raleigh, for Conference Treasurer, and that the Conference authorize the Commission on Budget to elect a Treasurer whenever a vacancy occurs *ad interim*.

At the request of the Treasurer your Commission recommends that the preachers be asked to make their remittances to the Treasurer by check; that they, instead of sending a number of small individual checks in a remittance, either secure a cashier's check or deposit the individual checks and send their own to cover the remittance.

It is further recommended that the bonds of the Conference Treasurer and of the Treasurer of each board be renewed in blanket form, as required in previous years, the Treasurer of each board to pay its *pro rata* share of the cost. This blanket bond is to be kept by the Secretary of the Commission in the vault of the Treasurer of Duke University. Col. John F. Bruton, Mr. Gurney P. Hood, and Rev. A. J. Hobbs are asked to serve as an Advisory Committee to the Treasurer during the ensuing year.

The property of the Assembly is still in the hands of Mr. James Atkins, Jr., Receiver, and he continues to give splendid satisfaction. He is loyal to all the interests he represents and is doing a great work in his double capacity of Receiver and faithful servant of the church.

The past season was well attended and the program was most excellent. The numerous training schools and conferences did most valuable work.

The General Conference allotment of \$7,500 to our Assembly insures the continued and increasing excellence of our summer programs.

We repeat that the Lake Junaluska Methodist Assembly is one of the most beautiful places in the world and is in the center of the greatest scenic attractions of eastern America. It lies at the gate of the marvelous Smoky Mountains National Park. It is not possible to find anywhere else in the world any place that excels Lake Junaluska in the combination of the loveliest scenery, the most delightful climate, the fellowship of choice Christian people, great spiritual leaders, varied and inspiring sermons, addresses, conferences, and training schools, interspersed with wholesome entertainment and noble music.

The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, owns in fee simple free of debt several acres of land on which is located the splendid Mission Building on the most commanding site on the Lake. The church also owns in fee simple a large body of land between the upper and lower parts of the Lake and on this lovely site are the large and attractive Christian Education Building, a dormitory building and a dining hall. Also several hundred loyal Methodist laymen and ministers own in fee simple attractive homes and home sites. This insures the permanence of Lake Junaluska as a center for summer homes and for religious and educational work by the church.

But we must not fail at the opportune time to clear the debt from the remaining property that is now in receivership.

We recommend that our people make their plans to go to Lake Junaluska next summer for delightful rest, wholesome recreation, and religious information and inspiration.

We recommend that Rev. H. C. Smith and Dr. W. P. Few be elected Trustees for a term of two years.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON METHODIST CO-OPERATION

The Commission held its annual meeting in the editorial rooms of the *Christian Advocate*, Greensboro, N. C., on Wednesday morning, October 16, the following brethren being present: Dr. W. A. Stanbury, Dr. M. T. Plyler, Dr. J. H. Barnhardt, Rev. C. B. Culbreth, representing the Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South; Dr. S. W. Taylor, Dr. R. M. Andrews, Dr. C. W. Bates, and Mr. W. T. Hanner, representing the Methodist Protestant Conference. At our last session an invitation was extended the Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in this state to have representation on the Commission. Dr. W. J. Plynt and Mr. I. A. Speaks were present to represent the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference, and were welcomed to membership on the Commission.

The Commission took the following action which it submits to you for your approval:

1. That arrangements be made for the holding of a meeting, or meetings, during the year similar to the one held last January in the West Market Street M. E. Church, South. Subject to your approval, the Commission names the following brethren to have charge of the arrangements: S. W. Taylor, C. W. Bates, W. J. Plynt, W. A. Stanbury, and the Chairman of the Commission, Dr. M. T. Plyler, who was named Chairman of the Committee.

2. That we suggest and recommend to the Boards of Christian Education of the several Conferences that they consider the advisability and practicability of holding united Young People's Conferences at such times and places as may be most agreeable; and that we further suggest the desirability of co-operation in the holding of local Standard training schools, and other such schools for the training of Christian workers, it being understood that there shall be an exchange of credits between the various Boards. We would suggest also that the ministers of the three churches take advantage of the courses offered in the Pastors' Schools of the three denominations. These suggestions are offered as a means not merely for more adequate instruction in Christian life and service, but because they present an opportunity for larger fellowship and acquaintance.

3. The Commission wishes to go on record as expressing its gratification that the Commissions on the Unification of Methodism have, as a result of their meetings during the year, formulated, and adopted by unanimous vote, a Basis of Union which we understand is to be released to the denominational press about the first of December. We rejoice in the progress that has been made in the direction of unification, and confidently look to its final consummation at no distant date.

REPORT OF BOARD OF MANAGERS OF NORTH CAROLINA PASTORS' SCHOOL

The 1935 Pastors' School met at Duke University, June 10-21, running simultaneous with the Institute of International Relations, sponsored by the American Friends Service Committee and Duke University, and the Rural Church Institute, conducted under the auspices of Duke University and the leading representatives of eight denominations. There was a profitable interchange of privileges. The program of courses and addresses was of high order, and together with the other institutes, attracted a larger number of people to the Duke University campus than any previous series of institutes have been able to do. The attendance in the Pastors' School was 364. The schedule of the 1935 school was so arranged as to provide for some of the courses to run the first week of the school and another set the second week, rather than for all the courses to run through the period of two weeks.

It is expected that the same plan of co-operation with the two above-named institutes will be carried out in 1936 as in 1935.

FINAL REPORT OF THE JOINT COMMISSION ON CHURCH BUILDING AT CHAPEL HILL

In the report of the Board of Missions, made to the North Carolina Conference at its session in 1919, was this paragraph: "M. T. Plyler and A. D. Wilcox have been appointed to meet with a Committee from the Western North Carolina Conference to study the situation at Chapel Hill and to recommend a policy for the future of our church there."

At the session of the Conference in 1921, in accepting the report of the Joint Commission, the Board of Missions recommended the following resolution:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that the time has come when we must face the problem of retaining our hold upon the life of our young people in our state educational institutions, and in order not to interfere with the previously planned program of our leaders in the church, we recommend that the Boards of Missions in the two Conferences of North Carolina contribute \$20,000 each; the Church Extension Boards \$10,000 each; the General Church Extension Board \$20,000; the local community \$20,000, and that the alumni of the University be canvassed to contribute \$50,000 for the building of a Methodist Church at Chapel Hill. Whenever the above mentioned parties shall have complied by cash, or subscription, with the proposed plan, then this Board pledges itself to provide for its part of the above amount. In furtherance of this plan we recommend the continuance of this Commission on this work.

In the report of the Joint Commission to the two Conferences in 1922, to the Joint Commission composed of E. K. McLarty, R. M. Courtney, Leon Cash, J. H. Barnhardt, J. F. Shinn, for the Western North Carolina Conference, and M. T. Plyler, A. D. Wilcox, Euclid McWhorter, Walter Patten, C. T. Rogers, from the North Carolina Conference, were added L. R. Wilson, E. W. Knight, R. L. Stroud, Clyde Eubanks and N. W. Walker, for the Chapel Hill Church. M. T. Plyler was Chairman, and R. M. Courtney, Secretary, of this Joint Commission from its organization. Each year they submitted a report to both Conferences as the work developed, getting the approval of the Conferences as they proceeded.

The report of the Joint Commission to the Conferences of 1926 began thus: "The task of building an adequate Methodist Church at Chapel Hill is practically completed."

The report made to the Conferences in 1928 showed that interest and other expenditures for furnishing, etc., had increased the indebtedness to \$72,318.18.

In 1929, the Conferences appointed a Committee of three laymen from each Conference to perfect an organization for liquidating the debt of the Chapel Hill Church. This Committee organized with a Chairman for each of the districts of the two Conferences, but owing to the pressing financial conditions only a few hundred dollars was raised.

In 1930 the Conferences devised a plan to raise \$100,000 to care for the debt on the College Place Church, Greensboro, N. C., and the debt on the Chapel Hill Church. Each Conference assumed \$50,000 and apportioned this to the districts to be collected in four annual payments. M. E. Hogan, of Chapel Hill, acted as Treasurer of the fund for the Commission.

The Joint Commission on work at Chapel Hill did not submit an annual report after the Conferences took over the liquidation of this debt in 1929. Neither were there formal reports made by the laymen's Committee or the Joint Committee of the Conferences on the liquidation of the debt.

The financial obligations of the Joint Commission in 1934 are disclosed in the report of the Treasurer, M. E. Hogan, which shows all obligations have been met; a surplus of \$25.87 remaining in the hands of the Treasurer. The report follows:

3. That this Commission lend its aid in promoting the work at Chapel Hill and College Place Churches.

With our grateful thanks to all who have aided in this building enterprise at Chapel Hill, we request that with the adoption of this report we be discharged and the work of the Joint Commission end.

NORTH CAROLINA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

Prompted by the growing desire to develop closer relations and more effective co-operation among the several branches of the Church of Christ in North Carolina, fourteen denominations, through representatives chosen in the manner preferred by each denomination, have completed, on November 14, at Guilford College, the organization of the North Carolina Council of Churches.

Entirely autonomous, and without official or even formal relations with any established union or federation of churches, the North Carolina Council of Churches is designed to furnish a means of gathering and disseminating information, of arranging for conferences, of encouraging discussion and improving facilities for common action in promoting the faith, idealism and purpose that may at any given moment seek to express themselves in the pursuit of a selected objective, or objectives.

Therefore, be it resolved:

1. That the North Carolina Annual Conference approves the organization of the North Carolina Council of Churches, and welcomes the opportunity of expressing through it more effectively the growing faith and power of its widely distributed membership.

2. That we confirm the nomination by Bishop Kern of the following persons to represent this Conference in the membership of the North Carolina Council of Churches: Dr. W. P. Few, Prof. J. M. Ormond, Dr. M. T. Plyler, Rev. E. L. Hillman and Rev. J. M. Culbreth.

REPORT OF THE RURAL WORK COMMISSION

Your Rural Work Commission, appointed one year ago, has held three meetings during the year, all members being present, and has given earnest consideration to the important responsibility laid upon its shoulders. We have co-operated with the General Rural Work Commission by furnishing considerable data relating to the present condition of the rural church in the bounds of our Conference.

Out of our observations and united thought, we wish to make some recommendations which we hope will be neither accepted nor rejected without serious consideration by the Conference. Our recommendations are of two types: some of them are for undertakings that should be fruitful of immediate results, others of them obviously are intended to prepare the way for achievements that should be equally fruitful but whose returns will be more remotely extended.

We recommend:

1. That all rural ministers make a strenuous effort to attend the Pastors' School and Rural Church Institute at Duke University next June, and avail themselves of all other privileges within reach to enrich their lives with inspiration and instruction.

2. That every rural minister formulate, at the beginning of the year, a definite plan of work for the entire charge. This plan should include definite responsibilities for every effective and willing lay member. Special thought should be given to planning a maximum use of the various services offered through Duke University School of Religion students in summer work.

3. That ministers be chosen for circuit charges on the basis of their strength and effectiveness, and for special fitness in meeting the demands of rural work, so far as possible. And that the length of rural pastorates be increased to give a better opportunity for constructive results.

4. That the cabinet give serious, prayerful consideration to the re-grouping of circuit churches in certain areas of the Conference in order that there may be a more even distribution of ministerial responsibility and financial support, and perhaps increase the number of self-supporting circuits.

5. That the findings of the General Rural Work Commission be given wide circulation throughout the Conference as early as they are made available.

6. That wider use be made of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* in promoting more effective rural church work, such as the printing of tested methods of and actual achievements in rural church work.

7. *Christian Education.* That every rural congregation be organized to carry on an effective program of Christian education, using such devices as Cokesbury courses, vacation schools, young people's unions, missionary education, church school day, and childhood and youth week. The church school should be led

to co-operate in the work missions, evangelism, and social service. The special help of Conference and General Boards of Christian Education, and of Duke Endowment assistants will be freely given to all rural charges.

8. *Evangelism.* Seeing that mass evangelism is not filling the total need in rural evangelism, and that hosts of people in rural territory never come under the influence of the church, we heartily recommend that more emphasis be placed upon personal evangelism and religious visitation by pastors and consecrated lay members. We are convinced that such efforts are indispensable in building up attendance at public worship, in reviving the interest of indifferent members, in creating a real Christian brotherhood of the entire church membership, and the enlistment of many who are not Christians and who would never be reached by mass evangelism.

9. *Church Finance.* We recommend the use of good business methods in the business of the Kingdom. We strongly urge the adoption of a well-planned budget by each rural church, the use of weekly or monthly offerings in envelopes, balancing of budgets each month or each quarter, the keeping of accurate records, the every-member canvass, and the development of the voluntary principle in church finance. Study courses in Kingdom finance should be provided for rural ministers and officials. Efficiency institutes for rural stewards and other officials should be held in our churches under the leadership of men with a burning message on the financial responsibility and integrity of the rural church.

10. *Social Service.* We know that there are usually more demands for social service within the bounds of a circuit than any minister is able to supply, and that our rural churches have not developed the service activity for the benefit of the whole of community life as perhaps they should have done. We, therefore, heartily recommend a more thoroughgoing investigation of social needs and a more careful planning of service programs through which the church in every community may register its interest in, and perform its Christian duty to all people in reach of the church. In this area there are vast possibilities of ministering to farm tenants and to all groups of rural folk who are in economic or social distress as well as those who are in moral decay.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO STUDY THE SALARIES OF MINISTERS

Your Committee appointed at the last session of the Annual Conference for the purpose of studying the question of ministers' salaries has given faithful attention to the responsibility imposed. We believe that if you will adopt the following report there will be a deepening sense of justice and ministerial brotherhood among those of us who are divinely called and officially sent out to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ. We beg leave, therefore, to make the following report, with the understanding that the recommendations contained herein shall not go into effect until the next Conference year:

Our study has convinced us:

1. That some seventy-five or more ministers of the Conference in the lower salary brackets are financially underprivileged. They are denied funds with which to render an effective service to the people of the church and with which they might secure intellectual training through the purchase of books, periodicals, pastors' school and institute privileges.

2. That there is an increasing demand among ministers of all salary ranks everywhere for some readjustment that will bring relief to those who are inadequately supported.

3. That there must be some shift in the methods of distributing mission funds so that such aid may increase rather than diminish the responsibility of the church members for an adequate ministerial support.

4. That additional funds should be provided in the North Carolina Conference to supplement the usual revenue so that every preacher who is at present underpaid may have a sufficient income to enable him to do an acceptable service.

We, therefore, recommend:

1. That all appropriations necessary to maintain the work of the church at educational institutions be assumed by the Board of Christian Education—which is the logical board to provide for such needs—in order that the money usually allocated to the Board of Missions may be applied to distressed charges throughout the Conference.

2. That all money appropriated by the Mission Board out of funds from the usual benevolent collections, and / or any supplementary funds that may come from other sources be distributed to those ministers who receive salaries of less than \$1,500 upon the basis of two considerations, namely: enlarged service to the people of the charge, and increased cultural advantages to the ministers themselves. Such consideration might be made as follows: (a) Appropriate a maximum amount for travel expense or serving the churches, said amount to be estimated by the need in each case and to be paid quarterly. (b) Appropriate a maximum of \$24.00 each year for the purchase of literature of a helpful and cultural character. (c) Appropriate the sum of \$12.00 each year for attendance upon the North Carolina Pastors' School, provided the pastor attends and receives credit for at least one course.

3. That every minister who receives a salary of \$1,500 or more be requested to include in his list of annual donations to the church some amount that will express his spirit of brotherhood toward his fellow ministers who are not so financially fortunate and that these fellowship donations be forwarded to the treasurer of the Annual Conference Mission Board to be administered through the regular channels. We suggest the following scale upon which donations may be made by those ministers who are willing to participate. A donation of

One-half of one per cent on salaries of from \$1,500 to \$1,199

Three-fourths of one per cent on salaries of from \$2,000 to \$2,499

One per cent on salaries of from \$2,500 to \$2,999

One and one-fourth per cent on salaries of from \$3,000 to \$3,499

One and one-half per cent on salaries of from \$3,500 to \$3,999

One and three-fourths per cent on salaries of from \$4,000 to \$4,499

Two per cent on salaries of from \$4,500 or more.

RESOLUTION FOR BETTER CARE OF SUPERANNUATES

In the resolution for a fellowship fund, adopted last Conference, it was provided "that we, as a Conference, may make an earnest and thoughtful effort to secure a more adequate provision for our retired ministers and also that we may provide for a better equalization of salaries for our active ministers, therefore, be it resolved:

"That a committee of five be appointed to study this whole question and make report to the next session of this Conference."

This committee of five has complied with the provision looking to "an equalization of salaries" but nothing was said about "a more adequate provision for our retired ministers." The need for this is such that we urge this committee to include the cause of the superannuates in this fund provided for the relief of men in the active ranks. These superannuates are not simply "financially under-privileged," they are shamefully neglected.

Be It Resolved: That a Special Committee be appointed to consider the proper support of our superannuates and report to the next session of the Conference.

THOMAS J. DAILEY

Thomas J. Dailey, son of James G. and Margaret Dailey, was born in Alamance County, N. C., May 7th, 1849, and died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. G. V. Albertson, Deland, Florida, March 9th, 1935.

November 9th, 1871, he was married to Miss Amanda B. Watlington, Rev. Jacob Doll officiating.

In the year 1877 he was converted and joined the M. E. Church, South, at Reidsville, N. C., Rev. V. A. Sharpe, pastor.

He was licensed to preach by the Quarterly Conference of the Wentworth Circuit in the year 1880, Dr. W. H. Bobbitt, presiding elder.

During the year 1881 he labored zealously as a local preacher, assisting his pastor and other preachers in revival services.

He served Pitt Mission as a supply, 1882-1883; here he did faithful work and the Lord owned and blessed his labors. One church was built, another completed and over one hundred souls were converted and added to the church during the two years he served this mission.

He was admitted on trial into the North Carolina Conference at Statesville, N. C., in the fall of 1883; he was ordained deacon by Bishop L. Parker, at Wilmington, N. C., in 1884, and was ordained an elder at Fayetteville in 1887 by Bishop Joseph S. Key.

After joining the Conference he served the following charges: Brunswick Circuit, 1884; Rutherfordton Circuit, 1885-86; Lenoir Circuit, 1887; Alexander Circuit, 1888-90; Bethel, 1891; Garysburg Circuit, 1892-93; Warren Circuit, 1894-96; Ridgeway Circuit, 1897-1900; Fremont Circuit, 1901-02; Gates Circuit, 1903-05; Hope Mills Circuit, 1906; Robeson Circuit, 1907-08; Troy, 1909; Buckhorn Circuit, 1910; Zebulon, 1911.

While at Zebulon his health failed and he asked for the superannuate relation in the fall of 1911, which was granted; but regaining health to a certain extent he was placed again on the active list at the Conference of 1912 and appointed to North and South Henderson where he served two years, 1913 and 1914. At the end of that year his health had again failed and he was superannuated never to take up the active work again. For twenty years he was a superannuate preacher, living a good many years at Cary, N. C. After the death of his faithful wife, and the marriage of his youngest daughter, he went to live with her in Deland, Florida, and remained in her home until the early morning of March the 9th, when he went away to live again with her who had been his faithful helpmate and had so faithfully shared his sorrows and his joys in the home and in his work as a Methodist preacher.

While he had been in failing health for a long time he was confined to his bed only six days before he passed away.

He gave to the Conference thirty years of devoted service. His work was thorough. He was a man of solid piety. There was something about him that suggested strength and stability. His record from the beginning to the end of his ministry was absolutely clean. He was as modest as he was brave. He cared nothing for show. He loved simplicity. High place and positions of prominence he never sought. He was satisfied to live the plain life of a Methodist preacher and he steadfastly believed that there is no position or calling that ranks any higher.

Having been his pastor for four years after his superannuation I can say that I have never been associated with a man who lived closer to God.

He was steadfast, reliable, honest, brave, faithful as a pastor, strong and vigorous as a preacher of the Word; and the impressions he made upon the charges he served will abide.

I shall never cease to thank God that I was honored with his intimate friendship and godly counsel in the early years of my ministry. As a young preacher I always found in him a good friend and wise counselor to whom I could go with every perplexing problem.

He is survived by two daughters: Mrs. A. G. Egerton, of New York, and Mrs. G. V. Alberston, of Deland, Florida, and Thomas Dailey, of White Oak, N. C.

May God bless the bereaved and preserve them to a happy reunion.

CARL ANDERSON JOHNSON

Few men who have entered the Christian ministry have wrought more faithfully and have won higher respect and esteem of their people than did Carl Anderson Johnson. His legacy is a life work well done, and a name honored and beloved by all who had the privilege to know him well. With keen judgment of values and people, with the spirit of tolerance and patience toward others, with a penetrating sense of humor, and with a fine spirit of loyalty, he was a valuable co-worker and companion in the Christian ministry.

In the prime of his ministerial work, he was estopped quickly by a severe heart attack after retiring Sunday night, March 31st. His day's work was done, but not his life's influence, for there live hundreds of people to testify to the inspiration and encouragement given by this humble disciple of our Master. He was friend to rich and poor alike, and to the saint and sinner.

The son of Alfred Marion and Sarah Ann Wilson Johnson, Carl Anderson was born at Holly Springs March 19th, 1885. From the public schools he went to Littleton, Rutherford, and Trinity Colleges to attain his education. This background gave him a desire to keep abreast of current events and religious thought, and to maintain a wholesome philosophy of life.

The Quarterly Conference of the Buckhorn Circuit, Fayetteville District, licensed Brother Johnson to preach April 1, 1910. He was admitted on trial into the Western North Carolina Conference, at Reidsville, 1915, and received the following appointments: Brevard Circuit, 1916; Rosman, 1917; Henderson Circuit, 1918-19; Traveler's Rest, S. C., 1920; Andrews, 1921; Bethel, 1922.

He transferred to the North Carolina Conference in 1922. In this Conference he received the following appointments: Kennekeet, 1922-23; Stumpy Point, 1924-25; Chowan, 1926-27; Seven Springs, 1928; Roseboro, 1929-31; Person Street and Calvary, Fayetteville, 1932-34.

His home life was marked with mutual understandings, hospitality, quietness, and loving devotion. After leaving Trinity College, he married Miss Margaret Dorsey, of Andrews, in 1915. Of this union three children were born: Mrs. Agnes Faircloth, Carl A. Jr., and Miss Annie Ruth. In

1922 he married Miss Beulah Whitmire, of Rosman, and of this union, Vera Mae survives. His widow makes her home at his birth town, Holly Springs.

The funeral services for Brother Johnson were held at Person Street Church, Fayetteville, by the presiding elder, Rev. D. E. Earnhardt, assisted by the Reverends M. C. Ellerbe, J. G. Johnson, M. Y. Self, and Walter Patten. The interment was in the Holly Springs cemetery, hard by his birth place. Many friends and co-workers in the ministry gathered to pay homage and to honor their departed beloved friend.

"A man he was to all the country dear,
And passing rich with forty pounds a year.
Unpractis'd he to fawn, or seek for power
By doctrines fashioned to the varying hour;
Far other aims his heart had learn'd to prize,
More skill'd to raise the wretched than to rise."

JULIAN LEWARK MIDGETTE

Julian Lewark Midgette, son of Ebenezer and Caroline Midgette, was born at Rodanthe, North Carolina, May 4th, 1885. Death came at Rocky Mount, North Carolina, May 4th, 1935. In his early childhood his parents moved to Manteo, North Carolina. In this atmosphere, rich in history, tradition and spiritual values, he had his education and religious training. On June the 27th, 1906, he was happily married to Miss Loudisa Hooper, of Manteo. The only child of this marriage, Linville Edward, was born in 1908. The mother and son survive. Mrs. Midgette makes her home in Norlina with the host of friends made in one of Julian's happiest pastorates. The son is in business in Cary, North Carolina.

Brother Midgette joined the North Carolina Conference at Fayetteville in 1912. During the twenty-two years of his ministry he served the following charges: Kennekeet Circuit, 1912-13; Hemp Circuit, 1914-17; Newton Grove Circuit, 1918; Chowan Circuit, 1919-21; Halifax Circuit, 1922-26; Norlina Circuit, 1927-31; Fuquay Springs Circuit, 1932; Cary-Apex Circuit, 1933-34.

During the last three years of his ministry he was struggling with a serious illness. Near the close of 1934, convinced that it was best for his church and wise for himself, he asked for superannuation. This was sorrowfully granted by his brethren at the Conference in Washington in 1934. In early December he moved to his home in Norlina and to the devoted friends awaiting him there. The sustaining thought in this move was not so much rest for his tired and pain-racked body as of fellowship with brother ministers who, he never doubted, would come to him. But this dream of the evening time was to be denied. Too spent to recover, he grew gradually worse, till the welcomed summons to the larger life came on May the 4th, 1935.

A great company, many of them fellow ministers, gathered at our church in Norlina for the final tribute to our brother. The services were under the direction of Rev. W. C. Martin, presiding elder of the Rocky Mount District, and Rev. W. C. Wilson, pastor of the Norlina Church.

To the writer of this memoir was given the privilege of paying a brief tribute on behalf of the many who had known him as friend and brother minister.

The ministry of Julian Midgette was for him a radiant experience and for those whom he served a benediction. But all life was for Julian a joy. To be with him at a game or in some congenial group was a delight. He thrilled to every big minute. He preached as one who had a message that must be delivered. He never minimized the needs of men lost in sin nor doubted the power of the Gospel he preached, to save men from sin. Wherever he preached men were saved. He brought to every pastorate the zeal of an evangelist and he was privileged to lead hundreds to Christ. By the best tests, he was a great preacher. He not only loved to preach, but he studied his preaching with the purpose to make the sermon meet the needs of his hearers. Giving up the pastorate was the supreme cross of his life, yet he met this as he met every challenge of life, not without pain but with fine courage. Mrs. Midgette says: "After his superannuation I often walked in and found him reading from a slip of paper, his face wet with tears. I never asked about it as his expression seemed to exclude me from the secret. After his death, while reading his Bible, I found the little slip of paper that I had seen so often and yet had not seen. The words express how deep the heart hunger for active service—

"'Laid aside!
Why, Oh God, hast thou made this decree?
With all my soul I long so, just to be
Out in the harvest fields
For they are white
And ready.
Precious souls are dying. Soon the night
Is coming.
Soon the little space that we call life is past.
The harvest time is waning fast.
Workers now are bringing in the sheaves
And I am idle here.
Since I may not go out
And help them bring the harvest home,
Perhaps a little melody I sing
May cheer them on.
Perhaps a little prayer I say
Will easier make their way'."

Thus to the end was his heart in the work to which God had called him.

Vain are words to express the meaning of a great good life. Hundreds will bear testimony to his capacity for friendship. None outside his home can really know how wise a father, how tender as a husband he proved to be. Many of us knew him as a gallant soldier of the cross. We miss his happy greeting but we thank God that for a while he went out to the work with us and we are stronger for the memory of his fine courage.

CHARLES MARTIN LANCE

Among the peaks of the Blue Ridge Mountains of Buncombe County, Charles Martin Lance was born March 7, 1870, son of John R. and Sophronia Chambers Lance. He died May 3, 1935.

On his mother's side he was of Methodist stock. His father was a deacon in the Baptist Church, but communed with his wife and children at the Methodist altar.

Charles was reared on a farm on Avery's Creek. He made diligent use of such books and schools as the community and times of his early days offered. A Godly father and mother, a few good books in the home, the Sunday school and the revival meetings conducted by the circuit rider had much to do with shaping his early life. When he was fourteen years of age, under the ministry of Rev. Frank Wampler, pastor of Mills River Circuit, Charles was soundly converted and united with the Methodist Church. He never had any ambitions for life's work other than to be a Methodist preacher. He began early to engage in religious work, and this was a means of his Christian growth and development. Everyone of his associates believed in him. He never swore an oath or learned to drink.

When his father died Charles continued the family devotion until he left home for school. He prepared for college at Mills' River Academy, and graduated from Trinity College, now Duke University, in 1903. During his last year in college he supplied the then Durham Missions, composed of Mangum Street, Pearl Mills, and Bethany.

He was ordained local deacon in 1901 by Bishop R. K. Hargrove, in Fayetteville, and was admitted on trial into the North Carolina Conference in Goldsboro in 1903, and in 1908 he was ordained elder by Bishop A. W. Wilson in Durham.

He served thirteen charges and added more than one thousand members to the church during the twenty-nine years of his active ministry.

He served the following appointments: East Burlington and Haw River, 1904; Alamance, 1905-09; Burgaw, 1910-11; Southport, 1912-15; Whiteville, 1916-17; Rosemary, 1918-21; Warsaw-Faison, 1922-23; Garysburg, 1924; Pittsboro, 1925-28; Ellerbe, 1929; Elizabethtown, 1930; Swan Quarter, 1931.

At the Conference in Greenville, in 1931, he tendered his place in the active work to others because of failing health.

Perhaps his most outstanding work was at Rosemary. A new parsonage was built, a church dedicated, and 293 members added to the church roll.

He was greatly interested in the cause of temperance, and for several years he served as chairman of the Conference Board of Temperance.

In the fall of 1905 he married Miss Ava Clendenin, daughter of Captain Clendenin, of Graham. In the year 1911 she passed to her home beyond. During these few years together, she was one of the finest help-mates that ever graced a Methodist parsonage.

In 1918, April 3, Brother Lance married Miss Zera Culbreth, of Clinton, a woman of charming Christian character and a model Methodist preacher's wife, who, with one daughter, is left to mourn his departure. He also has a brother in the North Carolina Conference, the Rev. H. E. Lance, now serving the Burlington Circuit, and three sisters, Mrs. Mary Johnston, Mrs. Fina Cochran, and Mrs. Hugo Stein.

Wherever Brother Lance served he was a conscientious worker, and in both pulpit and as pastor he sought to do well the task assigned him. He was always patient and sympathetic in his dealings with his people. He was full of faith and of good works, and radiated righteousness in his daily walk and conversation.

My own association with him ran through most of his ministry. He was at one time the beloved pastor of my brother and sisters, and they loved him for his genuine goodness. I was with him in several revival meetings, and I found him to be a deeply consecrated man. He had no malice against any one. His spiritual life was too deeply rooted to allow hate to enter his lofty soul. Living as he did, so close to Christ, he embodied much of His spirit, and was always ready to carry the burdens of others. His first thought was for his loved ones, his friends and his people whom he served. During the twenty-nine years of his ministry there was never a stain on his robe of righteousness. He lived what he preached and this gave him power with God and man. His sermons were well prepared and sound to the heart. All who really knew him saw only the Christ back of the message. Love filled his heart and a fire burned in his soul as he spoke with the voice of a Methodist itinerant. He could never rest until he had done his best to show the way of peace and good will. He won by his honesty, his genuineness, his consecration. In the fine soil of his soul only things that were gentle, pure and lovely could live and grow.

I never knew him to speak a word of criticism of his church. He believed genuinely in our itinerant system and never complained of any appointment that he received. He was a devoted pastor and soon learned to know and love the people he was appointed to serve. He knew how they lived and this enabled him to enter into their joys and their sorrows. Wherever there were people in distress or trouble this man of God might be found with words of comfort and consolation. He literally obeyed the injunction which sends us forth to comfort the people and to strengthen the brethren. His touch was gentle as the fall of a leaf when he spoke of the great love of God and the gentleness of Christ, the Great Comforter.

Among the prominent traits in the character of Charles M. Lance were gentleness, sincerity, truthfulness. He was possessed of a fine native grace which made him at home with all classes, and he made many friends. With modesty and rare self-control he moved in quiet dignity through his many years of service.

Brother Lance came to the end of his active life while serving at Swan Quarter. He realized his health was failing and when I said to him, "Brother, I feel you have reached the time for you to rest from your itinerant service," he said, in a beautiful spirit, "Brother McCracken, I am ready to do what you think is best for me and my church that I love as I love my own life."

For nearly three and a half years he held superannuate relation in the North Carolina Conference and lived with his wife and daughter, now thirteen years of age, in the Culbreth home in Clinton, where he passed to eternity as peacefully as the sleep of a babe—

"He was not; for God took him."

In the Methodist Church of Clinton, a short but impressive service was conducted by his pastor, Rev. Daniel Lane. His brother, Rev. H. E. Lance, and wife, with a number of his close friends, were present.

May 4, 1935, beneath a clump of cedars, a little mound of grassless clay rose up and said, "Let him sleep. The eyes that have looked out on congregations by the scores are now closed in peaceful sleep; the hands that so often pointed sinners to Christ, now rest across a bosom which for more than half a century had beat true for his Christ." The flowers smiled and seemed to say to those around his grave, Go on about your unfinished tasks. He is not dead but sleepeth'."

BENJAMIN E. STANFIELD

Since 1903, the name Benjamin E. Stanfield has been known in the affairs of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. He was born in Leasburg, North Carolina, on August 20, 1876, and died at Timberlake, North Carolina, on March 29, 1935. On December 28, 1897, he was married to Josephine Hambrick who, with four children, survive. He received his education in the common schools of his day and was able later on to pursue his studies further. In 1899 he was ordained deacon in the North Carolina Conference. In 1904 he was ordained elder and admitted to the Conference at Henderson, North Carolina, at the same time. During his thirty-two years of service he served the following appointments: Grimesland, Spring Hope, Richmond, Robeson, Chadbourn, Jonesboro, Creedmoor, Durham Circuit, and Mt. Tirzah.

This long record of rural work is a sufficient monument to his years of unselfish and devoted service. Each pastorate, it is observed, was a long pastorate. This, too, is the clearest evidence of his wearing qualities and the love and devotion of the people whom he served.

Brother Stanfield was always an acceptable preacher; his sermons were full of tenderness and in his evangelistic work he was able to preach conviction to the hearts of those who had wandered away from the Lord. There was no phase of the program of the church that was neglected by him and his financial reports during the years indicate his continual and persistent presentation of the claims of the Kingdom on the material resources of those who made up his flock. Brother Stanfield always left his charge better than he found it. He was constantly repairing churches and parsonages and here and there led in the erection of new ones. If he ever uttered a complaint we do not know it and it must have been that he met conditions in the midst of which it was hard to live.

Possibly the finest service which he rendered, however, was in another field—that of pastoral work. He was indeed a shepherd of his flock and carried in his heart not only all who were members of his churches, but the whole community in which he lived. In the days of the horse and buggy and later as he traveled by automobile, he was an untiring visitor among his people. Wherever there was sickness, he made his visits not once, but many times. He wept with those who were in sorrow and his presence in the hours of darkness was sought for. He was ever alert to the call of childhood and never failed to visit at the proper time and bestow his blessings upon the babies who came to live in the families of his members. His friendships were deep and abiding, he was often called back into the communities in which he had served, to bury the dead, to perform marriage ceremonies and to be present in family reunions. The

pastors who followed him never resented his presence for his aim and purpose was entirely unselfish as he sought to win these people to the Kingdom. The days were never too hot or dry, the nights were never too cold and wintry, nor were country roads too impassable to keep Brother Stanfield from answering the call of distress, whatever the hour, as he drove year in and out in tender ministrations to those who needed a message of a Savior. He was a crusader in the midst of all moral issues and for the cause of prohibition and every advance in social reform his influence was felt and he had to be reckoned with. He was especially sought in any form of community distress; he went forth to comfort the aged and to shield the orphan or to aid a wayward girl in her adjustment.

Second only to his church was his devotion to Freemasonry. Through this agency he established contacts with many whom he could not otherwise have reached. In the tiled recesses of many a Masonic Lodge he has helped to save many a man and to adjust many a community problem that the world will never know about. As the church honored him with long series of appointments, Masonry likewise honored him more than once as Master of the Lodge and for a long period he served as a District Deputy Grand Master.

Brother Stanfield leaves no heritage of earthly goods for the accumulation of these was not his aim. He went about doing good, forgetting earthly rewards. He leaves a heritage far richer than this and a long life of devoted service to his Lord and his fellowman and a good name upon which there was never the whisper of a blemish. His rugged physique harbored a rare spirit and soul and a heart like that of the Christ which loved everybody.

No finer statement can be made of Brother Stanfield and no more lofty estimate evaluating his life can be written than the following, which is a part of the report of the Committee on Necrology of the Grand Lodge of North Carolina:

"Brother Stanfield was a simon-pure Methodist circuit rider, mostly in a gasoline age. For three decades he served the folk of the countryside. The country people loved him and trusted him because he built them churches, won men to Christ, comforted the sick and afflicted, became the friend of the neglected and buried the dead. When the presiding Bishop appointed him to shepherd a new flock of Methodist saints and sinners he answered the call also to be of service to everyone within the bounds of his church.

"Such as he, 'have not ceased to be, else life were a chaos of value and love and reason set at naught. All those who were once here are still here, their words are they; their acts are they; and though these be forgotten, the spirit of their lives abides as a part of the great body of influence and law making for goodness and purity upon earth. Because they lived so nobly it is easier for all men to see the truth and to do right. If for no other reason it is worth while to live here that those who follow may live better'."

It was my lot on that rainy day in March to conduct the funeral service of our Brother. The little church at Timberlake could not begin to hold the throngs. The journey toward Roxboro and to Leasburg was made of a caravan of automobiles more than a mile in length. People from practically every charge that he had served were in that mourning

group. His mortal remains were laid to rest 'neath the soil of his native heath. A valiant crusader of the cross, a tender minister has passed down the last long trail of the circuit rider. With the thousands who miss him today, we, too, in quiet reverence say, "Peace be unto him," he was our friend and we loved him.

B. C. ALLRED

For thirty-four years Brother Allred was in the active ranks of the Methodist ministry in the North Carolina Conference. Born March 10, 1849, in Randolph County, N. C., to Claiborne and Orpha Allred, he was 34 years old when he joined the Conference at Statesville in 1883. He took the superannuate relation 17 years ago last December at the Conference session at Greenville in 1917. It is interesting to note how his life thus was set up in multiples of 17 years! Twice 17 years old when he began to preach, he was in active service twice 17 years and 17 years he spent as a superannuate! His last division would have been 18 years at the Conference this year, but he did not live to see it. After less than a week's final illness he passed in the early hours of November 5, 1935, to meet his Master face to face and "be with Him forevermore." In the home of his daughter in Oxford, N. C., he had a haven of love and care where he spent his last years quietly and peacefully without fear and without reproach. He did not go out much from the fireside, but he always welcomed friends and enjoyed their fellowship. No mother ever watched over her babe with more sweet delight than that daughter found in her attention to "Pahchee," as she fondly called him. What an ideal evening of life it was for him!

Brother Allred was twice married, first to Miss Sallie J. Rives, of Chatham County, of which union two sons survive: L. H. Allred, of Erwin, Tenn., and J. C. Allred, of Philadelphia, Pa. This marriage was on December 3, 1872. He was married the second time on June 7th, 1898, to Miss Dora Kimball, of Granville County. Mrs. J. K. Bryan, the daughter with whom he spent the last years, survives him from this marriage.

Educated at Old Trinity College in his native county, Brother Allred early developed a taste for beautiful things. He had absorbed many lovely bits of poetry and frequently quoted lines therefrom, even up to the week of his passing. He lived an inner life of constant browsing among the flower gardens of the soul. Such habits were reflected in his unfailing kindness toward small, weak creatures and gentle knowing appreciation of friends. He is said to have been a good preacher in his day.

Among his appointments were Youngsville, where he had his first pastorate and where he returned for his last, Tar River, Roberson, Jonesboro, Warren, Ridgeway and Mt. Tirzah. He served faithfully while he was able, and when the infirmities of age came on he still managed a farm he owned near Oxford. Those who knew him will testify that he had the knack of making farming pay, too.

God calls his servants and sends them forth to till, to sow, to water and to reap in the fields of His gracious service. When each one's day is over and the Master calls him back from his labors to rest for a little

GEORGE WASHINGTON STARLING

George Washington Starling, the youngest son of William and Elizabeth Starling, was born in Wayne County, North Carolina, July 17th, 1862. When he was three years of age his father died. This potential young itinerant Methodist preacher was thus left in the sole care of his widowed mother in Wayne County during the trying reconstruction days following the war between the states. His opportunities at school were such as many thousands of children in the rural south of that period were given by the "old field school." Later he attended Nahunta Academy where he studied in preparation for college. In September, 1888, he entered Trinity College and remained in that institution two years. In 1890, at the age of twenty-eight years, he was admitted on trial into the North Carolina Conference in session at Wilson, North Carolina. Two years following his admission he was ordained deacon and received into full connection.

On December 7, 1892, soon after his admission into full connection, he was married to Maggie Lee Starling, who was his faithful companion for forty-three years and who survives him. The only surviving child is Miss Mary Lee Starling, a graduate of Duke University and at present a member of the Duke University library staff, who lives with Mrs. Starling in the city of Durham.

During the thirty-seven years of ministerial service Brother Starling received the following appointments: Straits, Carteret, Elizabeth, Onslow, Cokesbury, North Gates, Perquimans, Buckhorn, Jenkins Memorial at Raleigh, Tar River, Four Oaks, Zebulon, Biscoe, St. Pauls, Garner, and Graham and Haw River. After his three-year pastorate at Graham and Haw River, at the Raleigh Conference, in 1927, he was assigned to Pantego-Belhaven, but because of declining health he was released from this appointment and established a home for the family at Durham, where he spent the remaining years of his earthly life.

With the exception of four years at Jenkins Memorial, Brother Starling spent his whole ministerial life in town and open-country churches, and thus had the high privilege of serving a larger number of congregations than has been the case in the ministry of most men in recent times. This quiet, unassuming Methodist preacher came into intimate, pastoral acquaintance with and unfolded Divine truth and light to some seventy-five congregations. What an opportunity did such an experience give him to mold the lives of thousands of people in the various walks of life and in all sorts of moral and mental states of existence! Were these beneficiaries of his consecrated ministry given an opportunity to say now how this man lived and labored among them, they would rise up to declare their faith in his integrity, their devoted love for him personally, and their gratitude for his abundant and constructive service to them and to the Christian Church.

He furnished inspiration and leadership in the building of eight new church houses and two parsonages, and in remodeling and enlarging a goodly number of inadequate churches. He enjoyed pastoral work and it was here as well as in the pulpit that he was able to make a strong and permanent contribution to the many people who were in need of spiritual guidance, consolation, and encouragement. It was his chief joy to lead persons into a profession of the Christian faith and into church membership. He also had the great satisfaction of seeing several of his spiritual children come into the active Christian ministry.

Brother Starling was a good man. His moral character was unquestioned by those who knew him. He was true to the high principles of the Christian religion and gave himself unreservedly to the work of the ministry. He was a spiritually-minded minister, spending much time in daily prayer and devotional reading, which empowered him for a wholesome spiritual guidance of others. During the several years of superannuation experience he made opportunity to render considerable service at the West Durham Methodist Church, where he was loved with a genuine devotion. He lived near the Woman's College campus of Duke University and he was alert to avail himself of multitudinous privileges offered by the university. The Pastors' School and other institutes, special occasions—when lecturers, preachers, or other speakers of prominence appeared—contributed much to the happiness and edification of this godly man. Whenever there were conferences and special meetings at neighboring churches, he was eager to attend and share in the benefits as well as contribute to their usefulness. When he was stricken October 17th, he was at Danville, Va., where he and Mrs. Starling had gone to attend the session of the Virginia Annual Conference. From this stroke he never recovered. He was brought to Duke Hospital where he lingered till November 7th. Rev. W. C. Ball, Dr. Frank S. Hickman, and Rev. L. S. Massey conducted the funeral services at the West Durham Methodist Church, November 8th, and he was buried in the cemetery at Zebulon, N. C.

MRS. W. J. WATSON

Josephine Virginia Callis Watson, the daughter of R. H. Callis and his wife, Mary F. Callis, was born in Mathews County, Virginia, February 15th, 1935. Funeral services were conducted in the Providence Methodist Church, Grafton, Virginia, by the pastor, Rev. J. T. Mills, of the Virginia Conference, assisted by Rev. G. B. Baldwin, of the Baptist Church, Mathews, Virginia, and Rev. D. D. Traynham, of Town Creek, North Carolina. She was buried in the cemetery at the church.

Mrs. Watson, in her youth, gave her life to Christ and joined the Methodist Church at the age of twelve. She was a devout and active Christian to the end of her days. It was her good fortune to be the child of cultured and consecrated parents, who taught her the lesson which it seems difficult for most of us to learn, that noble living is not found in self-indulgence and worldly vanity, but in humility of spirit and unselfish service for others.

On June 27th, 1906, she was united in marriage to the Rev. W. J. Watson, an honored member of the North Carolina Conference. Her influence has played an important part in her husband's life work. During the twenty-nine years of her married life she lived in various sections of the state and was a valued helper to her husband in his ministerial work. She labored with him as long as her health permitted, and filled well the responsibility of a Methodist minister's wife.

Just a few weeks before the end came Rev. L. B. Jones, the presiding elder, administered the communion to her.

During the last three years Mrs. Watson tested and proved God's promises by her own experience and could say without doubt, "I know in whom I have believed," and, "His grace is sufficient for my needs." Her Christian life was not adversely affected by suffering, but beautified, refined, strengthened and made pure and more real. To me she has been an example of the Christian under stress and trial. Her faith in God and his goodness never failed her. Her last words gave assurance of her hope and faith in God and his unfailing goodness.

"I cannot think of them as dead
Who walk with me no more
Along the path of life I tread;
They have but gone before.

"Mine are they by an ownership
Nor time nor death can free;
For God hath given to love, to keep
Its own eternally."

SESSIONS OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

The North Carolina Conference was set off from the Virginia Conference in May, 1836, and in 1850, and again in 1870, North Carolina territory in the South Carolina Conference was transferred to this Conference. In 1890 North Carolina territory in the Holston Conference and in the Virginia Conference, except that beyond the Chowan River, was transferred to the North Carolina Conference, and the Conference was divided into the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. In 1894 the remaining North Carolina territory in the Virginia Conference was transferred to the North Carolina Conference.
