THIRD DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

Friday, November 19, 1937.

Conference convened at 3:30 p. m., Bishop Kern presiding, and conducting the devotional service.

Committee on Aldersgate Commemoration:

F. S. Love read the report of the Committee on Aldersgate Commemoration. Dr. H. P. Myers, from Nashville, Tennessee, representing the Board of Missions, spoke to the report, as did Bishop Kern. Many laymen rededicated their lives to this experience. The report was adopted. (See Appendix.)

Conference adjourned with benediction by H. I. Glass.

FOURTH DAY

Saturday, November 20, 1937.

Conference convened at 9:15 a. m., Bishop Kern presiding, and conducting the devotional service.

Evening Session:

On motion, the Conference ordered that when it adjourns this morning's session, it do so to meet at 7:30 this evening.

Paper on Support of Superannuates:

T. M. Grant read a paper concerning better support for the superannuates. The paper was laid on the table until the evening session.

Leave of Absence:

Henry G. Ruark and Claud Nelson were granted leave of absence.

Time Extended:

On motion, the Conference extended the time for adjournment until 1:15 p. m. in order to hear Dr. H. P. Myers' address on Missions.

Ballot No. 3 for Alternate Delegates:

The Bishop announced that on the third ballot F. S. Love and F. S. Hickman had been elected as alternate clerical delegates, and A. M. Noble as alternate lay delegate, completing the required number.

Announcements were made, and the Conference adjourned with the benediction by W. A. Cade.

Appendix

REPORT NO. 1—BOARD OF MISSIONS

During the year 1938 Methodists everywhere are to give special emphasis to Mr. Wesley's "heart-warming" experience. Your Board of Missions is vitally related to this observance and is herewith calling upon every Methodist in the North Carolina Conference to join with Methodists elsewhere in a suitable celebration of John Wesley's spiritual birth at Aldersgate, May 24, 1738. We should not be content with a mere traditional commemoration of this history-making event, but we should have an intelligent understanding of what actually happened at Aldersgate and how Wesley's experience there so largely determined the history of our great church and other Protestant religions throughout the world.

The spiritual facts and experiences that transformed Wesley and which have made Methodism a mighty redemptive force in the world should again become regnant in producing a deep spirit of repentance and confession of sin which will make millions of new creatures in Christ Jesus. Out of this commemoration must come a new and more vital sense of the reality of Christianity and of its practical power to transform the entire life of the individual and of the social order. That such high aims may be effected in all Methodists within the North Carolina Conference and in order that our church may have its arms strengthened as we attempt to convict, serve, and save the thousands of unchurched people in city and country, we urge all ministers and laymen, all activities and organizations of our local churches to give hearty co-operation in the observance of the Aldersgate Commemoration.

We recommend that a School of Missions be held in every church if possible before May 24th of next year and that the study book, *Out of Aldersgate*, be used as a basis for the study.

We also recommend a Conference-wide missionary meeting to be held at a suitable place on or near May 24th at which time the Aldersgate Commemoration should be duly emphasized.

REPORT NO. 2—BOARD OF MISSIONS

To meet the need for a more effective organization in promoting the work of missions, the General Board of Missions in asking for the appointment by the Presiding Bishop, of District Missionary Secretaries to serve without salary and under the guidance of the Conference Missionary Secretary. Your Board of Missions heartily concurs in this suggestion and does hereby request Bishop Kern to make such appointments.

The prevailing conditions at home and abroad are opening the doors for the wise use of more missionary workers and material resources. Your board urgently requests the ministers and the chairmen of the Boards of Stewards to emphasize this need and to urge their people to accept higher percentages of the allotments for benevolences.

THE MISSIONARY INSTITUTE

The District Missionary Institute is a most valuable means of emphasizing and promoting the cause of missions. It is desired that these meetings be held early in January at the places and dates as agreed upon by the presiding elders and the Conference Missionary Secretary. Every charge should be represented by its mission-minded leaders. It is also desired that there shall be held group institutes within the districts which will permit of a more general development of missionary interest.

THE MISSIONARY COMMITTEE

The Missionary Committee in the local church is a vital unit in the work of the church for the promotion of the cause of missions. The District Missionary Secretary is asked to serve as chairman of all the missionary committee chairmen of his district, thus uniting all the missionary organizations of the district under one head.

The missionaries who are home on furlough offer an opportunity to get first-hand information and inspiration relative to the work in their respective fields. Their services are available and may be most effectively used.

COMMITTEE ON COUNSEL AND CO-OPERATION

Provision is made in the Discipline for a Committee of Counsel and Co-operation between the Conference boards of Missions and Christian Education. Such a committee has not previously existed in the North Carolina Conference. Your Board of Missions is, therefore, appointing the Conference Missionary Secretary, J. Freeman Heath, and J. M. Ormond as its representatives of this committee.

The Treasurer of the Board of Missions has been authorized to pay the board and registration expense of \$6.00 for all members of the North Carolina Conference whose salaries are less than \$1,500, who attend and receive at least one certificate of credit at the North Carolina Pastors' School, which next year will be conducted one week instead of two as heretofore.

We recommend the appointment of F. S. Aldridge as Conference Director of Golden Cross, and F. S. Love as Conference Missionary Secretary.

We nominate J. M. Ormond to succeed himself as member of the Board of Managers of the North Carolina Pastors' School.

We designate G. W. Perry, J. A. Russell, and M. W. Lawrence as members of the Committee on Evangelism.

We recommend J. C. Braswell and J. M. Ormond as nominees from the North Carolina Conference for membership on the General Board of Missions.

REPORT NO. 1—BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

I

LOCAL CHURCH SECTION

We wish to express our appreciation of the splendid work done by our Executive Secretary, Robert W. Bradshaw, during the year 1936-37.

After three years of effective service in our Conference as Director of Children's Work, Mrs. H. M. Wade has resigned, to return to her home in West Virginia. We would take this opportunity to express appreciation for the fine service rendered by Mrs. Wade, and note with gratitude the good foundation laid for children's work in our Conference as a result of her untiring efforts and capable leadership.

We are glad to report to the Conference progress in practically every phase of our Christian education program in the local churches. We would point out

certain facts in connection with several items that will indicate the possibility of further gains during the coming years.

There are 684 church schools in the North Carolina Conference. Of these:

- 184 held vacation schools during the year.
- 271 contributed to the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise.
- 164 were represented in young people's assemblies.
- 100 observed Church School Day.
- 200 provided some formal training for their members.
- 150 observed Childhood and Youth Week.
- 525 have organized Boards of Christian Education.

The cultivation of those schools now having no part in the various phases of the Christian education program is a goal to which we would work with increasing zeal.

There are two matters to which we would call special attention at this time:

1. *Church School Enrollment.* We note with a feeling of alarm the continued decrease in enrollment in the church schools of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Our Conference shares proportionately in this decrease. The records indicate a loss over the last ten-year period of 14,955 church school members in our Conference. We urge that every pastor work earnestly with his Board of Christian Education, and with the officers and teachers of his church schools, to see that every person, young or old, who should be receiving the help that the school affords be enrolled in the church school. A systematic and enthusiastic attack on this most serious problem should bring about a decided increase in our enrollment in the next few years.

2. *The Church School's Part in the Aldersgate Commemoration.* Bishop A. Frank Smith, Director of the Aldersgate Commemoration, has implied that "as goes the church school, so goes the Aldersgate Commemoration." We would accept that as a challenge to every pastor, church school superintendent, local Board of Christian Education, teacher, and pupil in the Conference. We call upon all who are engaged in Christian education work to commit themselves anew to the important task they have undertaken, and to make this year the most fruitful of all years in their Christian service.

We believe that the cause of Christian education in the North Carolina Conference is on the threshold of a great advance. In this advance may we all join under the leadership of the Great Teacher, Jesus Christ, who would have us understand more clearly, and would have us more eagerly point others to "the Way, the Truth, and the Life."

II

Your board is grateful for the progress made by our educational institutions during the past year. Student bodies have increased in their enrollment, and effective Christian training has been given.

LOUISBURG COLLEGE

We are glad to note that the enrollment of Louisburg College has increased from 273 students, as of last year, to 351 at the present time. The college not only is operating within its income, but has been able to make considerable payments on back indebtedness. The self-help plan is working very effectively.

GREENSBORO COLLEGE

Your board is gratified at the increased enrollment of students in Greensboro College, having now 371 students. Improvements have been made in physical equipment and additions to the faculty have been made.

We are encouraged at the progress being made in the financial campaign of the college and urge Conference-wide support of the institution in its centennial campaign.

DUKE UNIVERSITY

Duke University has made steady progress throughout the year. Its student body is composed of representatives from nearly every part of the world. Certain statistical data show something of the service rendered by our University. The number of students for the academic year, 1936-37, 3,367; the number of students for the summer school, 1936, 2,684. There are 372 officers and teachers, not including assistants.

The present endowment is \$34,197,536.30, while the plant and equipment are valued at \$26,787,034.39.

The University has 28 loan funds valued at \$1,606,337.74; scholarship funds valued at \$276,653.42; and 52 miscellaneous special funds, the sum of which is \$239,094.57.

We are in hearty sympathy with the plans of the trustees and faculty for the centennial celebration to be held in 1938.

SCARRITT COLLEGE

Your board is grateful for the work being done by Scarritt College. We recommend that the Board of Christian Education, through its Executive Secretary, co-operate in the matter of securing Scarritt associates for the college.

PASTORS' SCHOOL

The 1937 session of the North Carolina Pastors' School offered a very beneficial program. A considerable number of credits were granted.

The Institute of International Relations and the Institute for Rural Ministers were both successful.

REPORT NO. 2—BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

LOUISBURG COLLEGE

Your board has the following recommendations to offer with regard to Louisburg College:

1. That the Conference assume moral responsibility for the liquidation of the present debt of Louisburg College in the amount of \$65,000, as set out in the plan for settlement, upon the understanding that the creditors will extend the time for payment under the original plan until December 31, 1938.

2. That the campaign be continued and that the Conference approve the continuation of this movement, and pledge to the college board its whole-hearted and loyal support.

3. That the Conference approve the selection of a member of this Conference, upon nomination of the Bishop and his cabinet, who shall devote his entire time to this movement and assist in the field of public relations for the college.

4. That the Conference approve an addition to its budget of \$3,000 for the salary of the aforesaid representative. This item shall be added to the Con-

ference expense fund and shall be a preferred charge against the budget; and whatever increase it involves in acceptances on benevolences shall be distributed to all the charges and each charge is urgently requested to take its proportionate share of this increase in order that the college may be saved in this hour of its emergency.

5. That this Conference, by appropriate action, authorize and empower the Trustees of Louisburg College to mortgage or sell its Durham property and to mortgage its Louisburg property, the proceeds to be used and applied exclusively to the payments of the debts of the college as contemplated and that the regular appropriation made by this Conference to Louisburg College be ear-marked and applied as far as is necessary to the payment of interest on any new loan made by the College as herein authorized.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

Your board desires to submit the following:

The extension work should be given an enlarged place in the plan and effort of our Conference. Your board feels that the Commission on Budget should increase the appropriation to this cause. This may be done by increasing the percentage from 8.55 per cent to 10 percent. It is manifest to every thinking mind that the cause of Methodism can never be stabilized until every pastor has a place fitted and suited for the proclamation of the gospel, and a comfortable home for his family.

It must be apparent to every wise pastor of the Conference that many of our preachers are poorly housed, and many church buildings are inadequate. The expenditure of missionary appropriations under such conditions seems an extravagant waste so far as the upbuilding of the Kingdom is concerned because of non-representative physical equipment. This is especially apparent throughout our coastal regions, where storms have prevailed and floods have destroyed the property, and the people are left destitute.

After a personal interview with T. D. Ellis, of the General Board, the following conditions are found to obtain:

1. The great flood which swept throughout the valleys of the Mississippi and tributary rivers causing the destruction of churches and church property has been the greatest in the history of our church. Many of those churches and parsonages cannot be replaced on the original sites. As a result, the General Board of Church Extension has exhausted the donation fund. It will be some time before all of these emergencies are met. Therefore, there is left only a limited amount in the loan fund which may be applied in urgent cases.

2. As we come out of the depression we should put our money into new church enterprises rather than the payment of old debts. It is manifestly unfair to the new fields to absorb our new money in repairs and enlargements of churches which have been neglected when local congregations should have provided these repairs.

3. Every established church should seek to meet the expenses of new improvements as need occurs without contracting embarrassing debts which often prevent the progress of the church.

We are profoundly grateful to the Duke Fund Commission for substantial contributions to our church building enterprises, including the entire field of Methodism in North Carolina. They have liberally aided thirty-eight churches to the amount of \$43,660. This amount is exclusive of the \$41,900 for the maintenance of the work, and \$19,000 to the Superannuate Fund.

For these gifts we join the other boards in heart-felt gratitude.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

Because of the ever-increasing cheapness of modern literature which floods the public mind, it is highly important that our church take some action in staving off this ruthless inroad made by the scavenger of literature on the mental life of our people.

We must, therefore, through a process of sublimation, supplant this insidious evil by constantly keeping before the public and urging the people to make use of the best literature possible. This should be done by naming the best books, papers and periodicals from time to time.

To do this we would urge the following recommendations:

FIRST: That the church periodicals be brought into contact with the young people to a greater extent than now obtains, and to that end the Annual Conference of North Carolina request by definite resolution the placing of the *North*

Carolina Christian Advocate and the *Nashville Christian Advocate* in the libraries of the high schools within the boundaries of the North Carolina Conference. As a practical step in that direction, each district should plan for local units, whereby the local units will be charged with the duty of seeing that each high school library shall have one or both of these periodicals on the library table.

SECOND: That we urge our people to heartily support the Aldersgate plan as prepared by our Conference paper for an increased circulation of the *Christian Advocate*.

1. We suggest the following motto for every church this coming year: *Souls Aflame and Presses Humming Are Essential to Our Aldersgate Advance.*

2. That our *North Carolina Christian Advocate* be given an equal place with all other institution of the church in order that education, missions, orphanages and other interests may profit by its larger circulation, this being our one institution that can and does contribute to every undertaking in our two Conferences; also, that we continue as our goal to have every Board of Stewards 100 per cent subscribers.

THIRD: That we urge the circulation of the *Upper Room*, the *Cargo*, the *Epworth Highroad*, the *Christian Home*, and the *Church School Magazine*, together with other helpful aids among our publications.

FOURTH: We recommend that H. C. Smith succeed himself as a member of the Board of Publication. We also request the Bishop to re-appoint M. T. Plyler as Editor of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*.

REPORT NO. 1—BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

We, the Board of Lay Activities of the North Carolina Conference, beg to present the following report:

Our board, during the year, has earnestly endeavored to carry out the program adopted by the Conference in 1936. We have not fully accomplished all our objectives, but notable progress has been made in many directions.

We urge upon our laymen the practice of Christian stewardship as basic in all our work, and seek to lay upon their hearts the conviction that the most effective means of winning the world for Christ lies in the field of personal evangelism.

Not only as a program of work for the coming year but also as a challenge and an opportunity for service, we make the following recommendations:

1. That the Annual Conference accept the General Conference askings for General work; that an equal amount be apportioned for Conference work; and that the goal for 1937-38 be the payment of one-half of the benevolences by the time of the meeting of the District Conference.

2. That each charge put into operation an adequate financial system, including the "Every-member Canvass," weekly payments of pledges, and monthly settlement of all financial obligations.

3. That Institutes for Stewards be continued and expanded to reach every presiding elder's district within the Conference.

4. That classes for stewards be held in each church, and that the pastor or some qualified layman teach the course, using as the basic text, Morelock's *A Steward in the Methodist Church*.

5. That a District League of Stewards be organized in each district accord-

ing to the plan recommended by the General Board of Lay Activities.

6. That the Director for the Golden Cross in each local church be appointed immediately after the opening of the new Conference year, and that the local Board of Lay Activities lend him all possible assistance in his efforts to promote the hospital work of the church.

7. That our goal for the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* during the coming year be a copy of this splendid and indispensable paper in the home of every Methodist steward.

8. That the Conference program for the Methodist Orphanage be given our unqualified endorsement and whole-hearted support.

9. That the mid-year meeting of the Conference Board of Lay Activities be held in Goldsboro on a day (exact date to be announced later) preceding the meeting of the District Conferences.

10. That Laymen's Day be observed in every charge of the Conference on the third Sunday in May, 1938, or as near thereto as practicable, and that the topic—"Why Go to Church?"—be the subject for discussion on that day.

REPORT OF ORPHANAGE COMMITTEE

Your committee takes pleasure in reporting the Methodist Orphanage to be in a sound and healthy condition. Under the efficient administrative leadership of Reverend A. S. Barnes, the institution operates under a policy that is thoroughly sane and constructive.

Thirty-eight years of continuous service in carrying its ministry of mercy to the parentless children within the bounds of our Conference commends this home to the love and liberality of our entire Methodist constituency. Through these years literally hundreds of unfortunate children have been snatched as "brands from the burning" by the benevolent hands of this institution. Scores have been salvaged and saved, rescued and rehabilitated, then released again to take their rightful places in society as useful citizens.

We do not hesitate to say that through the facilities of our Orphanage the Conference continues to perform an indispensable humanitarian service, and makes this home a social asset of incalculable value. Our investment there is Christian charity in its fairest and most fruitful form. Macedonian calls from afar falling upon the ears of our Conference, however urgent and worthy, must never soften, nor silence, the cries of needy children at our very doors.

Three hundred such children are now happily harbored within this haven. Many more are seeking admission. The Superintendent reports that applications have reached a high mark. More have been filed this year than at any other time during his twenty-three years administration.

This is significant in the light of our contemporary social security legislation. The fact is, the relief programs now operative under county, state, and federal agencies scarcely scratch the surface in solving the acute problem of dependent and destitute children within the state. Our church and fraternal institutions still stand in the breach between an incompetent childhood, and the stern, grim aspects of misfortune in its multifarious forms. The social security act, nor any other relief legislation, has lifted to any appreciable degree the load which these private institutions are carrying; nor has it lifted from the shoulders of Methodists their Christian obligation in maintaining the institution that shelters these indigent children. Therefore, the impression to the contrary should be immediately counteracted and corrected. The support of our Orphanage will continue to be the direct responsibility of the churches of our Conference. We would be adverse to any other plan. A church-owned, and a church-controlled institution must remain a church-supported institution. We must not break faith with these children whose confidence is implicitly reposed in us.

A class of 26 graduated from high school last spring—the largest number in the history of the institution. Eight of our boys and girls are in college at the present time. Seven of our boys are taking vocational training. An equal number of boys and girls are taking business courses.

We are pleased to report the general health of the Orphanage family as good. Our home has been remarkably free from epidemics and contagious diseases.

The Orphanage, through its church school organization, carries on its own program of religious education. A new plan will be inaugurated at the beginning of the new Conference year which, we believe, will be more fruitful in meeting the religious needs of our children. The revival this year was conducted by Reverend A. P. Brantley. A definite contribution to the spiritual life of both children and workers resulted from his able and helpful preaching.

Physical improvements in our Orphanage plant during the year have increased our facilities, added to the beauty of the campus, and enhanced the value of the property.

The generosity of Mrs. G. G. Allen, of New York, merits the gratitude of the North Carolina Conference. Her recent gift of \$30,000 makes possible the construction of a beautiful building, furnished throughout, to be known as the Burwell Cottage, in memory of her father and mother, William Henry and Lucy Cole Burwell.

Funds have been provided for a gateway at the entrance of the campus on Glenwood Avenue by Mrs. J. C. Fuller, of Lumberton, in memory of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Best, of Goldsboro.

Driveways on the campus have been greatly improved.

An attractive and durable wire fence has been placed around the campus on Clay and St. Mary's Street, at a cost of \$2,000, thus eliminating the hazards of traffic accidents among the children.

Lovely curtains for the stage and draperies for the windows have added to the attractiveness of the auditorium in the Vann Building. The acoustics appear to be somewhat improved by this additional stage equipment.

Budgetary requirements for operation alone calls for an expenditure of \$80,000 during the current year. The ten percent apportionment, if paid in full, provides only \$37,000—less than half the cost of operation. Returns from the Orphanage Endowment funds will amount to \$17,000. An additional \$6,000 from the Duke Endowment gives us a total of \$60,000 in receipts, as against a necessary expenditure of \$80,000. This leaves \$20,000 to be secured from

other sources. Obviously, the need of specials is imperative. Your committee, therefore, recommends:

1. A more uniform observance of all fifth Sundays as distinctly Orphanage days throughout the Conference. Offerings are to be taken upon each such occasion.
2. That specials from church schools and organized classes be encouraged by our pastors and superintendents.
3. That a free-will Thanksgiving offering be taken in every congregation during the Thanksgiving season. Between Thanksgiving and Christmas the cause of our fatherless children should be championed in every church in the Conference.

In addition to the above, your committee favors the continuation of the Orphanage apportionment on the present basis of ten percent of the pastor's salary.

We recommend the re-appointment of Rev. A. S. Barnes as Superintendent of the Methodist Orphanage. The names of the following persons are presented for confirmation as trustees of the Orphanage: Mrs. G. G. Allen, Graham Woodard, J. P. Gibbons, A. H. Vann, J. C. Biggs, T. H. Colvert, E. L. Hillman, and Wesley Foreman.

REPORT OF THE BIBLE SOCIETY BOARD

Your board on the American Bible Society reports with satisfaction on the activities and achievements of the Society for the year 1936-37. Many improvements have been made in the plant of the New York branch, enabling the Society to better meet the demands made upon it for Bibles, and portions of the Bible, in every land and tongue. At the end of 1936 the whole Bible had been published in 176 languages, the New Testament in 214, portions or selections in 601 more, so that the Scriptures have now been published in 991 languages and dialects.

DISTRIBUTION

The Bible Society's chief task, of course, is the distribution of the Scriptures. During the year 1936, through its district and division secretaries in the United States and its agency secretaries abroad, the Society put in circulation in upward of forty countries, a total of over 7,760,000 Bibles, and portions of the Bible, an increase of more than half a million over the preceding year. Of this number more than 3,000,000 volumes were distributed in the United States. Many cheering reports have come from the agents in the foreign fields.

UNIVERSAL BIBLE SUNDAY

We, your board, recommend that Sunday, December 12, be set aside as Universal Bible Sunday and that the ministers and churches represented in this body be urged to take advantage of the co-operation offered by the Society in furnishing assistance, and plan carefully for a worthy observance of the day.

We further recommend that the ministers use the Society as far as possible in giving to our people the Bible and that the regular percentage of our benevolent offering be sent to the Society to help with this worthy cause.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON METHODIST CO-OPERATION

(FURNISHED AS INFORMATION)

Dear Brethren:

The Commission held its annual meeting in the office of the Editor of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*, with all the participating Conferences represented, but with a rather small attendance due to unavoidable absences on the part of the representatives from the three bodies constituting the Commission.

The Chairman of the Commission, Dr. M. T. Plyler, submitted a historic statement of the origin and purpose of the Commission. On motion of Dr. W. P. Few, the paper was ordered made a part of this report and the basis for any suggestions we may have to make to the Conferences. It is as follows:

"The two Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church at the annual session in 1922 provided for a Joint Commission on Methodist Co-operation in North Carolina. This Joint Commission met in Greensboro, January 18, 1923, and organized by electing Rev. M. T. Plyler, President, and Rev. R. C. Stubbins, Secretary.

"The personnel of the Joint Commission was as follows: Methodist Protestant Church, Rev. T. M. Johnson, Rev. J. D. Williams, Rev. R. C. Stubbins, Mr. R. F. Williams, Mr. J. H. Allen, and Mr. L. F. Ross. Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Rev. J. H. Barnhardt, Rev. J. F. Kirk, and Mr. Fred N. Tate, representing the Western North Carolina Conference, and Rev. M. T. Plyler, Rev. C. B. Culbreth, and Dr. W. P. Few, representing the North Carolina Conference.

"The Commission caused the following address to be sent to the Methodists of North Carolina: 'We are duly mindful of the common origin of our separate Methodisms, which are one in spirit, life and doctrine; and always have been a unit in the effort to spread scriptural holiness over the land. Moreover, the increasing complexity of the social order, with its problems and the readjustments going on about us, admonish us that our Methodist people must gather their forces for a more vigorous church life and unite for a mutual advance. Under the blessings of Heaven, our two Methodist churches must become a still greater force for righteousness and spiritual advance in North Carolina. Every atom of energy must be mobilized against a common foe; less of power and effectiveness, due to unnecessary friction, must cease. What can Methodists do to contribute to this end? We would suggest:

"1. That our preachers and people come to know the efforts and aspirations of each by cultivating more cordial and intimate relations one with the other. Interchange of pulpits and union of efforts in revival campaigns may prove helpful to this end.

"2. That wherever the two churches are working side by side in a community, careful attention and serious thought be given by both churches to see that some way be found to prevent antagonism and waste of energy in doing the work that Methodism as a whole should do. These local issues must be worked out by the good men and women who are on the ground and have been brought to see the sin of depleted strength that ought to be united against the enemies of righteousness.

"3. That due attention be given to co-ordinating undertakings and to readjustments of churches in certain sections where both must continue a useless struggle until the best and wisest will be convinced of the folly of present methods. Why not move to have the Conferences involved in this venture in North Carolina to establish a permanent Board of Mediation?

"4. That we plan and pray that our two Methodisms may this good year of our Lord be one in spirit and aim and effort in doing the work to which we are called in North Carolina."

"At a second meeting in Greensboro, October 10, of the same year, the Commission recommended to the Conferences that this Joint Commission be continued and authorized to use its best efforts to aid in the work of the two Methodisms. Since we 'favor and long for a united Methodism,' our first concern was to secure closer and more intimate co-operation between the two churches. Expressing our gratitude for the cordial and brotherly relations existing between the members of the great Methodist family, we suggested interchange of pulpits and certain readjustment as soon as possible of our country church work. From the first, fraternal messages have been heard at each of the Conference sessions.

"In 1932 further gratification was expressed over the appointment of the Commission of the three Methodisms looking to the present plan which is now nearing the final action of the Conferences.

"A ten year plan, similar to that which led to the union of English Methodism, was suggested in 1933, but the union movement has gone so much faster than any of us had thought possible a few years ago that a decade was not necessary.

"In connection with the Sesqui-Centennial Celebration of American Methodism, January 6, 1935, the first united conference of the three Methodisms in this state was held in Greensboro, Bishop William F. McDowell, of Washington, being the chief speaker. We have come along these past fifteen years pleased to know each other better as we have moved to the union of American Methodism.

"Would not this Aldersgate year be a favorable time for Methodism to become more nearly one in soul and body by stressing these experiences of early Methodists in all our churches? Allow me to suggest that this Commission take some definite action to report to our Annual Conferences."

As suggested by the paper, the Commission recommends that we give our thought and attention to the celebration of the Aldersgate experience. We are asking that a Committee be set up by each of the participating Annual Conferences to act with their Commission in planning programs and selecting places in which the three Methodisms may come together in the observance of this event which is our common origin. We are naming Thursday, December 2, 1937, at 10:00 a. m., at the office of the Editor of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*, as the time and place for holding the first meeting of the Joint Committee.

The Bishop named H. I. Glass, R. W. Bradshaw, and J. G. Phillips as the members from the North Carolina Conference.

We would call attention to our report to the Conferences held last year to the suggestions made therein concerning efforts to bring our three groups into closer fellowship looking to the time when they shall be united into the one new church. (See *Western North Carolina Journal*, 1936, page 73, and *North Carolina Journal*, 1936, page 68). A good deal of progress has been made in this

direction, a number of the churches putting at least some of the suggestions into practice. To these suggestions we would add that, wherever possible, the pastors and churches of the three groups unite in the holding of District Conferences, under the direction of the presiding elders, the District Superintendents, and the President of the three Methodist bodies.

We are taking the liberty of naming Rev. C. B. Culbreth to represent the Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at the session of the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church; and Dr. M. T. Plyler to represent the two Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at the session of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church.

May the blessing of God and the guidance of His Holy Spirit rest upon the deliberations of the Conferences as they meet in their sessions this fall.

REPORT OF THE JOINT COMMISSION ON WESLEY
FOUNDATION OF COLLEGE PLACE AND
CHAPEL HILL CHURCHES

The Commission has given careful attention to the work of our churches at Chapel Hill and College Place, Greensboro. The more than 1,400 Methodist students of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and of the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, are our special concern.

In helping these choice young spirits we not only help them as individuals, but they also go back into the communities and churches from whence they come to do the service of the Master.

We include the following statements as to the work in hand:

STUDENT WORK AT CHAPEL HILL CHURCH

The University Methodist Church at Chapel Hill has the task of serving the religious needs of more than 700 young men and women who are students in the University. To comprehend the magnitude of the church's task one need only

to be reminded that more than 200 Methodist freshmen are enrolled in the University this year. The religious problems and needs attendant upon this time of transition from home to college are manifold and acute.

Through its student work the University Church attempts to anticipate and meet these needs and to solve these problems, using various channels of influence. The Sunday services, a morning class, the worship service, and a forum, all are centered around the student and seek his spiritual orientation. As far as is practical, the conduct of student activities is in the hands of the students themselves, with policies being adopted, programs outlined, and plans made by leaders in training. The Sunday schedule is supported by various activities during the week. Social gatherings, recreational outings, deputations, and intimate discussion groups are among the regular features of the student program. In order to maintain close contact with all Methodist students in dormitories there is in each dormitory a leader with his floor assistants. Tying all of this together are the visitation of the pastor in the students' rooms and a program of personal counseling.

The University Church strives to help the students to maintain an attitude that is progressive, balanced, and above all, deeply spiritual.

COLLEGE PLACE CHURCH, GREENSBORO

There are 1,886 students enrolled at the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina, Greensboro, to date. Of these, 657, or more than one-third, are Methodists, and 310 have joined the Wesley Foundation organization and become affiliate members of College Place Methodist Church. Some who cannot attend the Wesley Foundation meetings join the local congregation in worship in one form or another at College Place Church each Sunday, approximately 400 in all. The Wesley Foundation, under the leadership of Miss Idalene Guldge, who for the past eight years has rendered excellent service, and Miss Marjorie Pouder, the newly employed Director, has made marked advancement. It has a larger enrollment this year than ever before in its history and is rendering a service to girls from every section of our state and from practically every state east of the Mississippi River.

The student organization and the membership of the local congregation have steadily grown until there is now an enrollment of 1,302 in the church school. They are greatly handicapped because of lack of space and equipment.

In order to carry on the work so well begun among our young people at Chapel Hill and College Place Church, Greensboro, the Joint Commission asks the two North Carolina Conferences for the following amounts:

The debt situation and inadequate plant at College Place were carefully considered by the Commission and on motion of Bishop Kern it was voted to request the two Conferences to appoint a committee to study the situation at College Place and to lead in a movement to provide for a suitable plant there. The Bishop named for the North Carolina Conference the following: A. J. Hobbs, Wilson; L. C. Larkin, New Bern; Dr. W. K. Greene, Durham; and A. M. Noble, Smithfield, and asks that they be confirmed.

REPORT OF FINDINGS COMMITTEE ON ALDERSGATE COMMEMORATION

The Committee appointed by the presiding Bishop to consider the co-operation of this Conference in the Aldersgate Commemoration now beginning has heard an outline of the general plan and begs to report as follows:

NATURE OF THE COMMEMORATION

The Commemoration is a spiritual movement under the direction of the College of Bishops and participated in by all the boards and other agencies of the church. It proposes to commemorate the bi-centennial of Mr. Wesley's "heart-warming experience" in Aldersgate Street, London, by leading our church into a deeper and more vital religious experience. It has no financial objective of any kind, save as such may voluntarily be assumed by a local church for its own purposes. It does not undertake any new tasks nor create any new organizations. It seeks a great spiritual awakening in the church, and it proposes to bring to modern Methodism the power and spirit which were the possession of early Methodism. It will endeavor to motivate all the progress of the church with a new spiritual experience.

THE NEED FOR SUCH AN AWAKENING

That such a movement as this is greatly needed is apparent to all. A spiritual revival, in fact, is the greatest need of the church and the world, a need which embraces all other needs. If this can come about, most of our other problems will be easy of solution.

The time is at hand when every energy of the church should be devoted to this end. We have an opportunity now that may not come to us again in this generation. In the hearts of our preachers and people alike there is a sense of spiritual need and a longing for a more personal touch with God. The Aldersgate Bi-centennial comes at a providential moment and enables us to focus the minds of our people upon spiritual reality and the original genius of Methodism. Our Bishops have been wise in their decision to utilize this historic occasion for the purpose of revitalizing the faith and experience of the church.

In this we are greatly interested and we place ourselves on record as determined to support the Aldersgate Commemoration in every possible way. To our Bishops, and especially to Bishop A. Frank Smith, Director of the Commemoration, we pledge our whole-hearted co-operation in carrying out every detail of the Commemoration plan. We call upon our preachers immediately to begin spiritual preparation in their own lives and churches, to inform themselves concerning the history, doctrines and work of Methodism, and to pray earnestly for the success of the entire movement.

CONFERENCE GOALS

The plan of the Aldersgate Commemoration has certain definite objectives for the whole church. This Conference will do its utmost to assist in the realization of these objectives. We recommend that we adopt the following goals for our own Conference, and call upon all preachers, people and agencies within the Conference to work for their realization:

1. A more vital experience of religion in the heart of every preacher and local church official and teacher, and a general religious awakening in every congregation.

2. The reception of not less than 7,000 members into our church on profession of faith during the coming year.

3. An increase of 25% in enrollment and attendance in the church schools of the Conference.

4. An increase to not less than 100% in acceptances and payments on the General and Conference benevolences during the coming Conference year.

5. The adoption of a definite set of objectives, or a continuation program, for each charge, in accordance with the plan of the Aldersgate Commemoration.

6. A cultivation movement in every church, using the literature provided and recommended by the College of Bishops and other agencies of the church, for the purpose of informing all our people in Methodist history, doctrines, and work, to the end that we may have a more intelligent, loyal and active church membership.

7. Co-operation, according to the plans now outlined and later to be announced by the College of Bishops, in every part of the Aldersgate Commemoration.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUGGESTIONS FOR REARRANGEMENT OF CHARGES

Your Committee on Suggestions for the Rearrangement of Charges, after a thorough study of the facts, is not in a position at this session of the Conference to make recommendations concerning specific rearrangement of charges. However, this study has convinced us that such a committee, working in co-operation with the Cabinet, can be of real worth to the Conference.

This committee is of the opinion that proper rearrangement of some of our pastoral charges will tend to equalize the pastor's task by distributing part of his work to another charge, or to other charges; to bring about a more equitable salary arrangement; and to relieve the Board of Missions of certain expenditures that could be used elsewhere to better advantage.

We recommend, therefore, that this committee, or a similar one, be continued for another year.

We further recommend that a mid-year meeting of this committee and the presiding elders be arranged, that the facts discovered and considered by the committee might be submitted to the presiding elders in time for them to utilize the information in the making of pastoral appointments.

RESOLUTION ON SPECIAL SUPERANNUATE FUND

WHEREAS, there is a most definite need for more adequate support for ministers when they are superannuated; and

WHEREAS, many of our ministers receive such small salaries that it is impossible for them to make adequate provision for the time of superannuation; and

WHEREAS, there should be some practical means by which ministers express their fellowship and brotherhood;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

That there be provided a fund for members of the North Carolina Conference from which payment shall be made to said members at the time of their superannuation according to the provisions contained herein.

This fund shall be raised: (a) by each minister, in full connection, paying one per cent (1%) of his salary each year (including missionary and Duke Endowment appropriations) from appointment received at the hands of the Conference.

(b) by an assessment placed on each charge in the Conference of an amount equal to one per cent (1%) of the pastor's salary. This assessment is to be in-

cluded in the amount assessed by the board of stewards for the support of the ministry.

Benefits shall be paid to members of the Conference on the following scale:

(a) to members now in full connection:

If superannuated at end of first year of adoption of this plan	\$ 100
If superannuated at end of second year of adoption of this plan	200
If superannuated at end of third year of adoption of this plan	300
If superannuated at end of fourth year of adoption of this plan	400
If superannuated at end of fifth year of adoption of this plan	500

(b) To those who may be admitted into full connection after the adoption of this plan:

If superannuated at the end of one year of membership	\$ 100

If superannuated at the end of five years of membership	500
If superannuated at the end of six years of membership	600
If superannuated at the end of seven years of membership	700

If superannuated after ten years of membership	1,000

The presiding elder of each district shall collect from each minister in his district each quarter an amount of 1% of what the pastor has received in salary, also he shall collect the 1% apportionment on the charge. These funds shall be remitted to the Financial Secretary of this fund along with the name and amount each minister has paid. The Financial Secretary shall keep permanent record of payments made by each minister and shall remit the money to the Treasurer of the Board of Finance. The Board of Finance shall handle this fund as a separate and distinct fund and for the purpose only designated herein.

After the first ten years there shall be held in reserve an amount equal to \$500 for each man who has been superannuated during the immediately preceding ten years.

Upon superannuation of any member who has failed any year or any number of years to contribute 1% of his salary, there shall be deducted from his benefit an amount equal to twice that amount he should have paid during the year or years he did not contribute.

If a participating member dies while in the active service, the Board of Finance shall pay his widow, any other dependent or dependents, an amount equal to the amount the member has paid into this fund.

Those who transfer into this Conference shall become members and benefits shall be paid upon superannuation according to the scale contained above: namely, \$100 for each year of service in the Conference until the maximum amount is reached.

Any member who is transferred out of the North Carolina Conference shall have the privilege of either (a) retaining his claim on this fund so long as he contributes 1% of the salary he receives wherever his appointment may be, or (b) be refunded the amount he has contributed to this fund.

On nomination of the Board of Finance the Conference shall elect a Financial Secretary of this fund. The duties of the Financial Secretary shall be to promote

this work, receive reports and funds from the presiding elders and pastors, keep permanent records of payments for each minister, and turn all funds over to the Treasurer of the Board of Finance to be distributed as herein designated. The Financial Secretary shall serve without salary but the Board of Finance may allow him not more than \$200 per year for all expenses he may incur in the discharge of the duties of his office. The Financial Secretary shall be bonded to an amount amply covering whatever sums he may receive or have on hand at any time.

The Board of Finance shall give the Annual Conference each year an itemized statement of all funds received, distributed and on hand. The Board of Finance shall invest reserve funds only in United States government and state bonds and no deposits shall be made in any bank in excess of that bank's insurance and guaranty of deposits.

Whereas, within the past twelve months there has been a virtual doubling of the sale of legalized liquor in North Carolina, and figures show conclusively that liquor has been largely responsible for the 41% increase in motor vehicle accidents in our state since repeal, and legalization has lent respectability, among some of our people, to the whole nefarious business; and,

Whereas, some of our people, and we fear some of our ministers, have been deceived into feeling that it might be wise to experiment again in so-called

control; we, the North Carolina Conference, in annual assembly, do hereby resolve:

That we implore all sincere repealists to return to the well-established truth that the only duty of the state in regard to this evil is to seek to prohibit it, and we assure every minister of our united support in his opposition to the further establishment of liquor stores within our Conference territory;

That we stand back of the public schools in teaching the harmful effects of alcohol and set ourselves with renewed vigor to such teaching in church and community;

That we refuse to support for public office any persons who do hereafter advocate the legalization of alcoholic beverage;

That we beseech all pastors and other church officers that they do not recommend, nor approve, for official position in any phase of church life, any person who drinks alcoholic beverage, advertises it, manufactures it, sells it, or in any way whatever seeks to promote this accursed liquor traffic; and, to this end, we further recommend:

That the seven presiding elders of our Conference constitute a body to effect these designs, and that our presiding Bishop appoint one of them as Chairman, to direct the temperance activities of our Conference.

RESOLUTIONS ON PEACE

Whereas we are deeply concerned over the present conflict in China, not only because of a spirit of Christian compassion for all our fellows, but also because the war directly affects the missionary enterprise and the members of our own church; and whereas we anticipate that a policy which begins with a concerted condemnation of Japan by heavily armed nations will lead to armed intervention; and whereas, we believe that a policy of enforcing peace with arms is self-contradictory; therefore, be it resolved: that we recommend to the President and Congress of the United States:

I. That our developing practice of not intervening with arms in the affairs of other nations be made our fixed policy.

II. That the United States, in co-operation with such democratic and relatively unarmed nations as Denmark, Norway, and Sweden, seek to constitute a group devoted to maintaining trade relations as nearly normal as possible with non-belligerent nations; trading with warring nations, whether attacked or attacking, only in goods destined to peaceful uses; and preparing the way for disarmament by extending among the nations the policy of no armed intervention.

JOHN JAMES BARKER

Reverend John James Barker was born in Milton, N. C., on June 9, 1867, and died in Ahoskie, N. C., on January 16, 1937.

Brother Barker received his education in the common schools of his day and at Trinity College. He was married to Mary Elizabeth West of Sampson County, North Carolina, on December 23, 1890. To this union were born six children, two boys and four girls. On September 24, 1923, his wife, who had been a wonderful help to him in his ministry, passed away and was buried in Ahoskie, North Carolina.

He was admitted on trial into the traveling connection in 1888 at the Conference held at New Bern, N. C., and served the following charges, viz: 1889-1890, Newton Grove; 1891-1892, Clayton; 1893, Raleigh, City Mission; 1894-1895, Aurora; 1896-1897, Roper; 1898-1899-1900, Roanoke Island; 1901, St. John's, Goldsboro; 1902-1903,, Bethel; 1904-1905, Supernumerary; 1906, Oriental; 1907, Mt. Olive; 1908-1909, Burgaw; transferred to Western North Carolina Conference and served Morven in 1910-1911; 1912, Biltmore and Mt. Pleasant; 1913, Andrews; 1914, Conference Evangelist; transferred to N. C. Conference and served Richmond Circuit in 1915-1916; 1917, Conference Evangelist; 1918-1919-1920, Harrellsville (now Ahoskie charge). At the Conference held at Rocky Mount in 1920 Brother Barker was granted the Superannuate relation, which honorable relation he held until his death.

Brother Barker was a fearless preacher. He received his message from God and was not afraid to declare it to his congregation. He denounced sin fearlessly and made no apology for it. His preaching was on the evangelistic order. He held many revivals and his work abides. He preached the doctrine of repentance and salvation through faith in Jesus Christ as the only way of life. He insisted on sinners coming to the altar to find Christ in true Methodist fashion, and many were the souls who were saved in his meetings.

If he had one gift above another it was the gift of prayer. When he prayed in the pulpit his congregation was lifted into the very presence of God, causing sinners to seek forgiveness and Christians to shout His praise. The people still speak of these prayers.

His funeral was conducted from the Methodist Church in Ahoskie on Sunday afternoon, January 17, by the writer, pastor of that church, assisted by Revs. B. O. Merritt, J. T. Draper, Oscar Creech, pastor of the Baptist Church of Ahoskie, and D. F. Waddell, pastor of the Ahoskie Presbyterian Church. We laid his body to rest in the Ahoskie Cemetery by the side of his wife.

Rest to his ashes, eternal joy to his soul.

ARMOUR DAVID WILCOX

It is a rare soul that will not accept defeat when odds are seemingly insurmountable. The person of Armour David Wilcox knew no defeat. His soul in its passion for victory lashed a weary body to arduous tasks and to its grave.

He was born of rugged, intellectual parents, Loyal Manley Wilcox and Mary Belle Morrison, of Scioto County, Ohio, June 1, 1868. His father prepared for the Presbyterian ministry, but doctrinal and creedal questions thwarted the high aim. The son inherited an ambition for an education and a life of unstinted service. His education was attained at Ottawa High School, the Emporia Kansas Teachers' College, and Ottawa University, where he received his B.S. degree. Upon graduation, he accepted the work of superintendent of schools at Onaga and Ottawa, Kansas.

Having seen the evils of the liquor traffic, he soon devoted his powers to drive "demon rum" from its stronghold. He became secretary for the Kansas State Temperance Union, then lecturer for the same organization, being associated with the late Dr. Charles M. Sheldon in this work. The whole force of his powerful invective and personality was thrown so effectively against this evil that the Anti-Saloon League of America retained him as a regular lecturer. From this advantageous position he wrought valiantly to free America from the curse of beverage liquor. It was while making a lecture tour through eastern North Carolina that he met Dr. Fred D. Swindell, then pastor of the Methodist Church at Wilson. Dr. Swindell was so attracted by the forceful personality and the effective addresses of the lecturer that, after many long and friendly talks together, Mr. Wilcox decided to enter the Methodist ministry. Consequently, at Rocky Mount in 1906, he entered the North Carolina Conference on trial. He was ordained Deacon by Bishop A. W. Wilson at the Annual Conference held in Durham in 1908, and ordained Elder by Bishop E. R. Hendricks at Elizabeth City, December, 1910.

His first appointment was Wakefield Mission, and thereafter he served the following charges: Raleigh, Central (1910-12); Louisburg (1913-16), and during this pastorate he was made financial agent for Louisburg College, and raised the money to build the Davis building; Goldsboro, St. Paul (1917-18). At the Annual Conference held in Goldsboro, December, 1918, the Board of Missions recommended that Bishop Darlington appoint him Conference Missionary Secretary of the Centenary Campaign, stating that he "is pre-eminently fitted for this task." After the Centenary, he served the following charges: Durham, Trinity (1920-23); Wilmington, Grace (1924-25). At the Annual Conference held in Fayetteville (1925), Bishop Collins Denny transferred him to the Western North Carolina Conference, giving him the appointment to Trinity Church, Charlotte (1926-27).

During this pastorate Trinity and Tryon Street congregations were merged to form First Methodist Church, and the two ministers were appointed to serve a joint pastorate at the new church. At the succeeding Annual Conference he was sent to Monroe (1928), and the following year to Salisbury (1929). During this year his left eye became infected and his vision was greatly impaired. Thereupon Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon at the request of the Louisburg Church, returned him to the North Carolina Conference and assigned him to Louisburg (1930-31). At the succeeding Annual Conference, held in Henderson, his sincere, pleading appeal in behalf of Louisburg College saved that institution from being forced to close its doors. From that hour he became its champion, and was so recognized by the people of Louisburg and the officials of the college that he was persuaded to accept the presidency of the financially distressed college. At the Annual Conference held in Greenville, November, 1931, Bishop Mouzon so appointed him.

Mr. Wilcox gave himself unreservedly in re-thinking the mission and the scope of the work of that institution. After careful study of other junior colleges, he adopted a self-help, co-educational system that made its appeal to the students who craved an education but could not pay the costs involved at other standard colleges. Under this new system, the enrollment of students greatly increased. But there was the threatening debt hanging over the college like a suspended dagger. To thwart this danger, he was working upon a plan of settlement with the creditors, and then to seize the opportunity of making a Conference-wide campaign, granted by the previous Annual Conference, to raise the funds to lift the debt. It was this arduous work that sapped his physical energies. No more heroic services have been rendered for the Church in the North Carolina Conference in recent years than by this devoted servant of God. He refused to let lameness and scanty vision be an impediment to diminish his services for his Lord and God.

He was married to Miss Adelaide Lorraine Simons, June 10, 1902, at Chetopa, Kansas. Of this union three sons were born, Armour David, Jr., Ward Manley, and Robert Morrison, who was accidentally killed by an automobile during the Goldsboro pastorate. These three survive.

This faithful minister was a born advocate of education, justice and righteousness. He had the courage of a reformer, the vision of a builder, and the power of a commanding personality. He was named to represent the Board of Missions of the Joint Commission of the North Carolina and the Western North Carolina Conferences to plan and to build an adequate Methodist church at Chapel Hill. His life has been filled with strenuous labor for a better world. He accepted with a will hard tasks that others shunned, and spent his all for their attainment. His body was growing weary of the unrelenting demands made upon it by a strong will and an alert mind. Consequently, after a few days of illness he quietly, on March 8, 1937, followed the

sun westward at the bidding of his Father, "It is enough; come and be at rest."

As his body lay in peace in the small Methodist Church at Louisburg, loyal friends, college students, alumni and officials, townsmen, fellow ministers joined in a tribute of love and admiration for such a life of fidelity to his Lord and to his fellowmen, and of worth whileness to his generation. At sunrise his body was placed at rest on a beautiful knoll at Lake Junaluska.

"Beyond the last horizon's rim,
Beyond the adventurer's quest,
Somewhere they rise, serene and dim,
The happy, happy Hills of Rest.

Some evening when the sky is gold,
I'll follow day into the west;
Nor pause, nor heed, till I behold
The happy, happy Hills of Rest."

THOMAS HENRY SUTTON

Thomas Henry Sutton, son of James and Nancy Sutton, was born in the Goshen Section of Sampson County, North Carolina, November 25, 1862, and died at his late home in Fayetteville, North Carolina, April 10, 1937.

He was educated in the schools of Sampson County, North Carolina, and at Trinity College, now Duke University. He was admitted on trial into the traveling connection of the North Carolina Conference at its annual session, December, 1894. During his active ministry he served well the following charges: Junior Preacher, Hay Street, Fayetteville; Market Street, Wilmington; LaGrange Circuit; Williamston and Hamilton; Northampton Circuit; Hope Mills Circuit; Four Oaks Circuit; Siler City Circuit; Jonesboro Circuit; Person Street and Calvary. Here because of failing health he closed his active ministry by taking the superannuate relation at the Conference of 1920. Since this time he lived in quietude and happiness to the date of his passing.

On January 22, 1896, he became a most happy Methodist preacher in his marriage to Miss Mary Lamb, of Fayetteville, North Carolina, who had much to do with his achievement of success in the ministry.

Brother Sutton was of such a gentle spirit and mild temperament that a rough word would have desecrated his lips, and a hasty, unkind act would have done violence to his nature. He was always an optimist regarding worthy individuals and worthy movements, ever ready with a considerate explanation for any failure. Hence any depression of spirits never clouded his countenance. In the shadows he always saw a way to the light, and to him that light was Jesus, always his first, abiding and

final appeal. He bore patiently with the infirmities of others, ever ready with his mantle of charity to throw over their weaknesses.

No surprise that one of such characteristics should draw to him as with hooks of steel those so fortunate as to know him. No surprise that he should so delight in preaching a Gospel of Christ's love and gentleness that won many from the paths of sin to those of righteousness. Though an effective Gospel preacher, he excelled especially as a pastor in the home in personal touch with the unsaved, the sorrowing and discouraged. His pulpit messages were his freside messages, and therefore his parishioners saw none of the professional mixed in his pulpit or personal ministrations. His passion for souls led him to gladly make an opportunity of any personal contact to get the unsaved sinner to Christ.

His life record was of building up everywhere he went not for newspaper columns, but for God's eye. His clean life and Christian consecration have won him a place in human confidence and affection that forbade any question of his motive or character. Among the fruits of his labors live today three useful influential members of the North Carolina Conference, along with numbers of useful men and women among the laity.

I am glad to have had frequent close contacts with Brother Sutton in his last days. I am glad to have observed his serenity of spirit and assurance of faith that kept his same lips free from any word of complaint though for years a sufferer from heart trouble. During his closing days any reference to his future was met by an uplift of his index finger along with a smiling look toward his home on high. Brother Sutton died as he lived, in the sunshine of the blessed assurance that all was well with him. He heard his Lord's call and walked quietly out of his happy life here into a still happier life hereafter. Brother, rest on 'neath the hovering wings of peace, perfect peace.

STEPHEN ABRAHAM NETTLES

In the pleasant little town of Summerville, South Carolina, in the Methodist parsonage, on April 18, 1859, was born to the Reverend Abraham Nettles and wife, Elizabeth Lowry Nettles, a son, whom they named Stephen Abraham. This boy was destined to fill a large place in the life and development of the best of South Carolina's and North Carolina's people for 78 years. Having been born in a Methodist parsonage, it was natural that this boy should have early acquired the idea that preparation is fundamental to useful living. After attending grammar school as opportunities afforded in the itinerant life of his father presented themselves, he entered old Cokesbury School, graduated, entered Wofford College, and in 1882 received his A.B. degree. For some years immediately after his graduation, he was prin-

cial of the Manning Academy at Manning, South Carolina. Later he entered the newspaper world and at different periods was editor of The Clarendon Enterprise, The Manning Times, and The Sumter Herald. In 1889, Brother Nettles became prominent in the South Carolina prohibition movement and in 1892 he was elected to the State Legislature, where he led the prohibition forces in the lower house. His life long, he was devoted to the fight against strong drink.

In 1893 he was admitted on trial to the South Carolina Conference, and for twenty-two years thereafter he was one of its most useful members, having been editor of The Southern Christian Advocate, the Conference organ, during the last ten years of the twenty-two. His opportunities in the South Carolina Conference were: 1893, Newberry City Mission; 1895, Campobello Circuit; 1898, Pacolet Circuit; 1902, Branchville; 1906, editor of Southern Christian Advocate. In the North Carolina Conference his appointments were: 1916, Buckhorn Circuit; 1917, Pantego-Belhaven; 1918, Fairfield; 1920, Newport Circuit; 1921, Dover Circuit. In 1922 he superannuated and sustained that relation until his death.

Brother Nettles was married three times, first to Miss Sue Galluchat; three sons of that union survive their father and mother. In 1896, his first wife having died some time previously, he was married the second time, the bride being Miss Lottie Lee Jones, a daughter of a Methodist preacher. This wife died in 1897. In 1916 he married Miss Estelle Hendrix, who survives him with five children.

One of the great interests of Brother Nettles' life was the Epworth Orphanage at Columbia, S. C. In 1904 he erected the Nettles Home, a building on the Epworth Orphanage campus, which provides for thirty-two girls. Throughout his life he was a constant and liberal contributor to the Orphanage. Less than a week before his death he walked from his home to the Orphanage office four blocks away to make what proved to be his last contribution to that cause.

A man of deep convictions, Brother Nettles stood immovable for the things that were right as he saw them. He never gave ground in any contest against evil. A thoughtful preacher, an interesting writer, he used both pulpit and press in an untiring effort to combat the evils of his day. It is said that in every charge he served as pastor the forces of wickedness quickly learned to respect if not to fear him.

He was also active as a church builder, having a record of some kind of building operations on every charge of which he was pastor.

Sunday, April 18, 1937, was Brother Nettles' seventy-eighth birthday. He attended church, as usual, and returned home to find that there had gathered with his wife his eight children, four grandchildren, one great-grandchild, and several nephews and nieces to honor him on his anniversary. After a delightful fellowship with his loved ones, he lay down to rest and in his

sleep heard the Master's call to come up higher. His body lies buried in the cemetery at Manning, South Carolina.

As preacher, editor, teacher, pastor, husband, father, friend, this man lived busily and devotedly, creating an atmosphere of refinement, culture, and saintliness wherever he moved. He wrought well. He has gone to a noble reward.

WILLIAM ROBERT HARDESTY

William Robert Hardesty was born at Harlowe, Carteret County, North Carolina, December 20, 1889. He passed away at Duke Hospital, Durham, North Carolina, May 24, 1937. He was buried in Harlowe Church cemetery.

The days of his youth and young manhood were spent at Harlowe. Here he attended the school of his home community. Having felt that God had called him to preach the everlasting gospel of Jesus Christ, he attended Elon College that he might be the better prepared for this high task. He was admitted on trial into the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church at Greenville, North Carolina, in 1917.

He was a faithful servant of his Lord, bearing witness to His redeeming love wherever he went. The attributes of his character were simple and direct. He was human, companionable, and a true friend. He believed in the right and dared to stand for it. He loved the work of the church and he had a great affection for his family and friends. These were the objects of his life's deepest devotion. He toiled diligently and willingly without hope of great reward. It was his single ambition to bring the light and love of God to the lives of those he sought to serve.

The sun of his life was at its zenith when he left us. He was in the middle of his first year as pastor on the Atlantic charge. His people of this charge he served loved him and he in turn was devoted to them.

Among several other charges he served during his ministry are: Wanchese, Currituck, Grimesland, Fairfield, Robersonville, and Shallotte.

He married Miss Bertha Malloy Curriss of Shannon, North Carolina, who was a helpful and devoted companion. To this union were born three children: Joanne, William Robert, Jr., and Jessie Blue. To this little family circle he gave the best of his love and devotion. Here his heart was happiest as he mingled with those near and dear to him.

As his widow she has the happy memory of having served the Master for many years with this good man.

Rufus Bradley will be greatly missed by many of our preachers, for he had something to give men. He lived quietly but effectively. He easily impressed one with the strength of his faith. The defeated and broken-hearted were glad to see him, for the power of his faith brought them refreshment. His gentle nature seemed to be a ready medium through which the Spirit of God went to needy men.

Not only will we miss his power of faith in God, but we will always remember the affectionate way with which he seemed to touch all life. The attitude of this good man always seemed to be motivated by love. He could march with his Master in genuine friendship toward all men.

With great faith and affection went another soul quality that made him a great Christian, and makes us remember him very pleasantly. Unselfish service to him was far better eloquence than high sounding phrases. Through service he felt that a man could speak the language of God and bring the world invisible to the hearts of men. Therefore the spirit of the cross was foremost in his ministry and the many charges which he faithfully served in the North Carolina Conference bear the marks of his blood given freely that men might find the more abundant life.

We are happy that he lived and dwelt among us. We know God lives because he lived in Rufus Bradley.

Brother Bradley died in Rocky Mount, N. C., June 18, 1937, and was buried in Littleton, N. C., a town blessed by his sacred ministry.

WALTER GRADY PILCHER

Walter G. Pilcher was born in Schley County, Georgia, 1888. He joined the Andrew Chapel Methodist Church at the early age of six, and was licensed to preach at the age of eighteen. He attended Emory University, and was admitted into the South Georgia Conference in 1910, Winston, Georgia, at the age of twenty-one. His first appointment was at Ideal, Georgia. He was ordained Deacon in 1912, and ordained Elder in 1914. His last appointment was at Hazelhurst, Georgia, where he completed twenty years faithful service in Georgia. He was transferred into the North Carolina Conference in 1930 at Henderson, N. C., and was appointed to the Red Springs charge in the old Rockingham district. He served Red Springs charge one year and then was appointed to the Kinnakeet charge, where he served faithfully and well for two years. It was at Kinnakeet where his health failed him and he took the superannuate relation, and moved back to Georgia to live at Ellaville. He moved near Americus, Georgia, in 1934 and lived there until his death in the Americus Hospital, Monday, November 8. His funeral was conducted from his home on Wednesday, November 10, by Dr. J. A. Thomas, assisted by Rev. L. T. Rogers.

Brother Pilcher is survived by his widow, two daughters, Mrs. Clyde Tondée of Ellaville, and Miss Volna Pilcher of Andrew College, Cuthbert, Ga., and one son, E. N. Pilcher of Blue Springs near Hawkinsville, Ga.

He gave twenty-three years of faithful and effective service to the kingdom of God; and it may well be said of him, "Well done good and faithful servant, enter into the joy of thy Lord."

D. N. CAVINESS

Brother D. N. Caviness got a rather late start in the work of the ministry. Late in the autumn of 1889, at thirty years of age, weeks after school had open, he entered Trinity College with enough to have discouraged a less heroic spirit. A serious attack of typhoid fever detained him and left him with hair thin, body emaciated and face palid, so his future in college appeared anything but rosy. But this brave soul was never daunted. To the great astonishment of his friends in a surprisingly short time vigor of body and the marks of health had returned. Soon this virile man who had spent his early life in secular pursuits had become a vital and esteemed part of the college community. He made good in the classroom and early won a first place on the football field. A strong body and mature judgment, along with fine human qualities, won for him admirers on the gridiron where both brains and brawn played a part. All were his friends in the college community. This same friendly, brotherly spirit and devotion to the work of the ministry enabled D. N. Caviness to win through forty-five years as a Methodist preacher.

Doctor Newby Caviness was born in Moore County, November 18, 1859, and he died at the home of his son, Dr. Verne S. Caviness in Raleigh, September 28, 1937. He was the son of Arnold Edward Caviness of Randolph County and Margaret Tyson of Moore County. Of his seventy-four years, forty-five of these were spent at Trinity in preparation and as a useful member of the North Carolina Conference. D. N. Caviness was admitted on trial into the Conference at Goldsboro in 1892. He was ordained Deacon in 1894 and Elder in 1896. His thirty-six years in the active work were spent as follows: Hillsboro, four years; Carr, Durham, four; Roxboro, two; Burlington, three; Aberdeen, four; Warrenton, four; Morehead City, four; Central, Raleigh, three; Cary, four; Epworth, Raleigh, four; Franklinton, one. At the close of this year, 1928, at the Wilson Conference, he was granted the superannuate relation. Since that time he has spent his winters in Florida and his summers in the mountains of western North Carolina.

What an eloquent tribute is that list of churches served by this good minister of Jesus Christ! Here is a string of churches made up of the good substantial people of the state who stand for the best things and are duly appreciative of manhood and devotion in their pastor. For the most part, he stayed the full four years limit and his churches would have been glad to have him continue longer with them. The same fine qualities he displayed in college under adverse conditions were his through life. Having been a comrade of his for three years in the rough and tumble of the gridiron and a friend and brother in the North Carolina Conference through more than four decades, I can testify to the sterling qualities and abiding loyalties of this good

man who found his place in the ranks rather late, but who at the last was numbered with the conquerors. Before and after entering the ministry, D. N. Caviness was engaged in many useful undertakings, notably he assisted in securing special school act by Legislature about 1906 for Aberdeen, and he was placed by the Legislature on the first school board at Aberdeen under the act.

He was a member of the Board of Trustees that opened up Caswell Training School for the feeble minded at Kinston, and served on the board for many years.

Funeral services were conducted in Central Methodist Church, Raleigh, where he had once served as pastor, during the afternoon of September 30, by J. H. Barnhardt, E. C. Few, S. J. Starnes, and Leon Russell. A large concourse of people, including many of his friends of the ministry, were present for the service. His body was laid to rest in beautiful Montlawn cemetery in the city of Raleigh.

Brother Caviness was married to Miss Nora Cummings of Guilford County in 1894. Surviving is his wife, whose home is in Ocala, Florida. Also four sons—Dr. Verne S. Caviness and W. B. Caviness of Raleigh, Rupert Caviness of Ocala, Florida, and W. C. Caviness of Philadelphia. There is one daughter, Mrs. George A. Foss of Philadelphia, and a sister, Mrs. C. C. Holt of Concord.

ANDREW W. PRICE

Andrew W. Price was born at Avon on the "banks," April 1, 1861, and died there October 28, 1937; and he was buried there among his own people whom he loved and served as pastor for more than ten years. His funeral was conducted from the Avon Methodist Church by Rev. M. W. Maness, a former pastor, Rev. Thomas Merrimon, present pastor, Rev. John R. Poe of Hatteras, and Rev. E. G. Overton of Moyock. The largest crowd ever to assemble at any one time on the "banks" attended his funeral and this fact bespeaks the love and high esteem the people had for him. He was probably the most beloved man who ever went up and down the coastal country preaching and in all the Albemarle section. Wherever he lived and served the people respected, trusted, and loved him as a man of God and a true friend of man, and the people heard him gladly. His heart went out to those in need, in trouble, and in sin, and he gave of his best to meet those needs. Like his Master, he went about doing good.

In his early days he helped his father as a fisherman, a boat builder, and served as captain of a schooner. He largely educated himself, and taught school in Manteo, served as county commissioner of Dare County, and as superintendent of public instruction of his county.

Brother Price felt the call to become a fisher of men in his thirties and for several years served as a local preacher. As a

local preacher he was ordained Elder in 1900, and was admitted to the Conference in 1904 at the Conference in Henderson.

In addition to serving Kinnakeet charge (his home people) for more than ten years at four different times, he served the following charges: Kitty Hawk, Columbia, Roanoke Island, Camden, South Camden, Manteo, and Edenton.

Brother Price was married in early manhood to Miss Rebecca Scarborough of Avon on December 19, 1880, and to this union was born one daughter, now Mrs. C. O. Miller of Elizabeth City, N. C. His first wife died in 1922, and he was married again on June 8, 1923, to Miss Elizabeth O'Neal of Manteo, who survives him and will make her home in Manteo. Both of these good women were congenial companions and helpful to him in all his endeavors.

Brother Price gave an unusual account of his life and ministry to his Lord and church he loved and served so well. He was a great fisher of men and sought them out in highways and by ways; he was a true soldier of the cross, ever lifting its flaming banner high; he was a good shepherd and led his flock into green pastures and where the still waters flow.

He had a fine sense of humor and his contacts with people were wholesome and inspiring to all who knew him. He lived joyously and served faithfully; he was a vigorous preacher with an evangelistic passion. He talked to the writer a few days before he went to the glory land about his home-going. He was radiantly happy, smiling through tears as he realized his frail craft was just about to become unseaworthy, but he had the blessed assurance that the boatman would reach safely the happy golden shore, the haven of rest.

Having spent his life and effective ministry along the coastal country, and passing on serenely in sight of the Pamlico Sound on the one side and the great Atlantic on the other, Tennyson's "Crossing the Bar" is a fitting sentiment of his home-going and and of his attitude:

"Sunset and evening star,
And one clear call for me!
And may there be no moaning of the bar,
When I put out to sea,
But such a tide as moving seems asleep,
Too full for sound and foam,
When that which drew from out the boundless deep
Turns again home.

"Twilight and evening bell,
And after that the dark!
And may there be no sadness of farewell,
When I embark;
For, though from out our bourne of time and place
The flood may bear me far,
I hope to see my Pilot face to face
When I have crossed the bar."

MRS. J. H. FRIZZELLE

Friday night, November 5, 1837, after what would seem a finite human understanding, an all too brief life, the lovely gentle spirit of Mrs. Penelope Carter Frizzelle quietly passed from its "earthly house of this tabernacle to the building of God, the house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens."

She was in the forty-fifth year of her life, having been born April 8, 1893. The spirit of youth and the grace of maturity were beautifully blended in her life. The last seventeen of these years were lived in the relationship of the Methodist itinerancy as the devoted wife of Rev. Jas. H. Frizzelle of the North Carolina Conference to whom she was married July 14, 1920, Rev. John H. Shore officiating.

During the thirteen years of these years until her husband took the superannuate relation she gave charm, grace and dignity to the parsonage home. She exemplified those Christian graces which made her truly the helpmeet of her minister husband. The people loved her.

The last four years of their companionship were spent in the quiet and beauty of their home in Wilmington, N. C., where they have lived in company with her mother, Mrs. Luther Carter, and her brother, John Carter. These with another brother, Sandy Carter, of Jacksonville, Fla., survive her.

Beyond her home and family her interest and service flowed over into such other public relations as the U. D. C. and Red Cross work.

Fitzgerald, the pastor, assisted by Rev. E. T. Halleck of the Episcopal Church. She was laid to rest in the family cemetery lot at Whiteville.

MRS. JOHN ALBERT HORNADAY

Mrs. John Albert Hornaday was born near Laurinburg, North Carolina, in what was then Richmond County, now Scotland County, December 18, 1853. She was the oldest of the twelve children of Hugh and Sarah Hall McCall. Two of the other children, Francis Bragg and John Calton McCall, were members of the North Carolina Conference at the time of their death, the former having served many years in the Methodist itinerancy and the latter dying in his early ministry.

In April, 1877, Lucretia Ellen McCall married Rev. John Albert Hornaday, and for the thirty-nine years of his active ministry and several of his period of superannuation, she proved herself his all-round helpful companion, contributing much to

his unusual success as a Methodist preacher in his various fields of religious effort. Her girlhood period immediately following the ravages of the Civil War deprived her of school facilities, but the handicap of the ensuing want of an education was more than counterbalanced by her native intellect and sturdy common sense.

On May 26, 1826, her husband died in Maxton, North Carolina, where she remained and continued to help in the great work they both so greatly loved, until she was stricken ill last November and died on December 22, 1936, just past her eighty-third birthday. At 11 o'clock a. m., December 24, 1936, her funeral services were held in the Maxton Methodist Church from which she was buried in the East View cemetery nearby. Rev. P. O. Lee, her pastor, and Revs. J. G. Johnson, J. H. Buffalo and J. M. Applebee, pastor of the Maxton Presbyterian Church, were present and took part in the services.

She leaves the following children to honor themselves by doing honor to her name: Dr. Clifford Lee Hornaday, of New York; Mrs. G. D. Stephenson, of Richmond, Va.; Mrs. A. C. Carter, Laurinburg, N. C.; John Albert Hornaday, of Enfield, N. C.; Dudley Latimer Hornaday, of Salisbury, N. C.; Leslie Black Hornaday, of Charlotte, N. C., and five grandchildren.

MRS. J. B. HURLEY

Mrs. J. B. Hurley died May 14, 1937, and was buried in Lexington, where four preceding generations of her mother's and of her father's family are also buried.

Lena Leonard Hurley was born October 16, 1869, daughter of William C. B. Leonard and Mary Jane Roberts Leonard. She lived, until her marriage, with her parents in the home of her maternal grandparents. It was a charming old ante-bellum home of a Methodist family prominent in Davidson and Rowan counties, and a home in which bishops, presiding elders, and numberless other Methodist preachers were entertained. It was a happy home for a large family circle, grandparents, parents, and seven children—six daughters (Lena the second child) and one son. She was educated in the private school of Miss Laura Clement and in the Lexington Seminary, from which she graduated under the direction of Dr. Dred Peacock, so well known in the history of Methodism and North Carolina of this generation.

On February 13, 1889, at the age of nineteen, Lena Leonard was married to Rev. J. B. Hurley, a young Methodist preacher, and they went to live in a parsonage at Louisburg. A few months later the Methodist Church in North Carolina was divided into two conferences, the North Carolina and the Western North Carolina. Mr. and Mrs. Hurley spent the rest of their active life in the eastern section of the state, living in the following towns: Raleigh, Oxford, Wilson, Raleigh again, Fayetteville, Durham,

New Bern, Rockingham, New Bern again, Roxboro, Burlington, Clayton, and Maxton.

Mrs. Hurley was the devoted mother of three children: Maude, Mrs. William Charles Chadwick, of New Bern; Dr. Leonard B. Hurley, professor of English in the North Carolina Woman's College at Greensboro; and Helen, Mrs. Thomas S. Newbold of Goldsboro. When her husband retired from the active ministry in 1930, she returned with him to her ancestral home in Lexington, and spent the last seven years of her life quietly and happily in the home which she had known and loved throughout her life. She is survived by her husband and the three children, two grandchildren, Susanne and Betsy John Hurley of Greensboro, by four of her five sisters and her one brother—Mrs. A. E. Smith, Mrs. C. A. Hunt, Mrs. E. E. Raper, Mrs. W. J. Byerly, and Roberts Leonard, all of Lexington.

These are the short and simple annals of a beautiful life, beautifully lived for others. Mrs. Hurley had the gentleness and charm that belonged to our older South in its best estate. Her husband and children, and many in a large circle of friends all over North Carolina, are witnesses to her devotion to the finer things of our human life.

It can most truthfully be said of her that, though her body almost reached the age of 89, neither her mind nor spirit passed beyond the fairest years of noble womanhood. Her mind was active right to the end, solicitous for the welfare of those about her. She was alive to every issue, and interested in every problem. She possessed in fine degree the best traits of Southern womanhood.

Justly proud of her five daughters, their children, and their children's children, she passed her last years atune to their every need and interest, and alive to the best Christian culture about her. Well did she exemplify George McDonald's lovely statement: "Age is not all decay; it is the ripening, the swelling, of the fresh life within, that withers, and bursts the husk."

A bright, sympathetic smile bestowed upon a youth at the height of fun and frolic of a house party, and, later, the understanding assistance of an earnest friend in the serious business of serving the spiritual needs of college students tell the story of a fleeting acquaintance with Mrs. J. M. Rhodes, who died when forest leaves were changing color under autumn's chilling breath.

But a deeper knowledge of her personal excellence came from acquaintance with certain women grown to usefulness and grace beneath the transforming spirit of her brooding love. One sped away to a land now in the throes of mighty conflict to share "the far-sent message of the years," and "shed the coming glory of the Light." Her own sweet life was the price of her brave devotion. Another became the wife of a business man who met the shock or disaster with courageous cheer, won through defeat to Fortune's smiling company, and spread his growing genius over many states. In all the struggle, the woman at his side proved a comfort and support beyond compare. One other shared the changing fortunes of a growing family, endured the sorrow of bereavement with unyielding hope, and provided for her children a heritage of culture and renown. These three were products of the faith and purpose of the friend and teacher in whose release to larger life they now rejoice.

For Mrs. Rhodes at an early age gathered up her quickened and growing powers and laid them on the altar of selfless service in behalf of others. A college education flowered in the training of a voice which she dedicated to making the world "all jubilant with song." As the wife of a college president, however, the range of her influence quickly extended beyond the conservatory. She became a kind of Mother Superior to the girls who came to the school. By geography and the calendar the dimensions of this precious life seem triflingly small. At Oxford she began to live, in the year 1868, the welcomed child of Rev. and Mrs. W. S. Hester. At Greensboro and New York she studied. At Littleton and Winter Haven she labored. And now, in the glowing autumn of 1937, we have seen her face

"All radiant with the glory and the calm
Of having looked upon the front of God."
