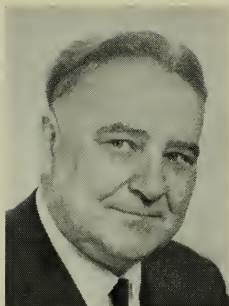

†Historical Statement

The North Carolina Conference was set off from the Virginia Conference in May, 1837, and in 1850, and again in 1870, North Carolina territory in the South Carolina Conference was transferred to this Conference. In 1890 North Carolina territory in the Holston Conference and in the Virginia Conference, except that beyond the Chowan River, was transferred to the North Carolina Conference, and the Conference was divided into the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. In 1894 the remaining North Carolina territory in the Virginia Conference was transferred to the North Carolina Conference.

The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church was composed of the North Carolina Conference of the former M. E. Church, South, and parts of the North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Protestant Church and the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church. The former Methodist Episcopal Church gave to the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church 9 preachers, 11 charges and 1,837 members; the former Methodist Protestant Church 23 preachers, 20 charges and 9,152 members; the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 273 preachers, 226 charges and 132,735 members.

**RULES OF ORDER AND PROCEDURE FOR THE NORTH CAROLINA
ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH**

I. RULES OF ORDER

1. Robert's Rules of Order shall apply to any situation not covered by these Rules.
2. No member who has the floor may be interrupted except for a breach of order, a misrepresentation, to direct the attention of the Conference to the fact that time has arrived for a special order, or to raise a very urgent question of high privilege.
3. No member shall speak a second time on the same question if any member who has not yet spoken desires the floor, nor more than twice on the same subject under the same motion, nor longer than ten minutes unless his time shall be extended by the Conference, except as provided in Rule 4.
4. When the report of the committee is under consideration and when all have spoken who desire to do so, or when (and after) the previous question has been ordered, the chairman and/or duly authorized member or members presenting the committee's report (and the minority report if there be one) shall be entitled to speak before the vote is taken.
5. A member claiming the floor at any time for what he believes is a very urgent question of high privilege, shall be allowed to indicate briefly the nature of the question, and if it be adjudged by the chair to be such, he may proceed at his pleasure, or until the chairman judges he has exhausted his privilege.

6. Voting shall be by a show of hands unless otherwise ordered by the Conference. A "yea" and "nay" vote, if taken, shall be by written ballot, which result will be published in the Conference Journal. A count vote may be ordered on call of any member supported by one-fifth of the members present and voting, in which case the delegates shall rise from their seats and stand while they are counted.

II. ORGANIZATION

1. The Secretary: The secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected quadrennially, at the first session of the Conference after the meeting of the General Conference; and on nominations arising from the floor.
2. Assistant Secretaries: The secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.
3. Statisticians: There shall be a conference statistician and an assistant statistician. The statistician shall be elected quadrennially at the first session after the meeting of the General Conference. The assistant statistician shall be elected annually upon nomination by the statistician.
4. Conference Stenographers: The conference secretary shall employ the conference stenographers.
5. Compensation: The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given officers for their services and also the method and amount for meeting expenses of said officers. The conference treasurer shall pay these amounts.
6. Boards, Commissions, and Committees: The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all boards, commissions, and committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except in those cases in which the *Discipline* directs otherwise. The recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Conference.
7. The Conference Board of Trustees: The Conference Board of Trustees shall be required to meet at least once a year other than the regular meeting at the session of the Annual Conference.
8. The Conference Treasurer and all others receiving and disbursing funds from our Conference shall be required to make audited statements annually, and to print the same in the Journal.
9. Program Committee: There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the District Superintendent of the District in which the session of the Conference is held, the pastor of the host church, and the Conference Lay Leader. This committee shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers and this shall be paid from the Conference expense fund.
10. Committee on Conference Objectives: There shall be a Conference Quadrennial Committee on Conference Objectives. See Paragraph 651—Question 47, page 198, 1960 *Discipline*.
11. Entertainment Committee: There shall be a Conference Entertainment Committee, composed of three ministers and two laymen. This committee shall be elected at the first session of the Conference following the General Conference, and shall serve for the Quadrennium. This committee shall receive invitations and determine the place and method of entertaining the Conference sessions. The committee is requested to determine the place of holding the next Conference not later than January 1, if possible.
12. Committee on Memoirs: The Conference Secretary and the District Superintendents shall constitute the Committee on Memoirs. The members of the committee shall be charged with the responsibility of providing for all the details of the memorial service. The Conference Secretary shall be the chairman of this committee.

13. Committee on Daily Minutes: A committee of three members shall be elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report daily to the Conference.
14. Courtesies and Resolutions: There shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions, annually, at the first session of the Conference.
15. Committee on Appeals: There shall be appointed, quadrennially, a Committee on Appeals, composed of at least five members, whose duties shall be to hear appeals from the decisions of the several District Boards of Church Location and Building, or any other questions that may properly come before them.
16. American Bible Society: All matters regarding the relation of the Conference to the American Bible Society and its work shall be referred to the Board of Education.

III. REPORTS, RESOLUTIONS, MOTIONS, AMENDMENTS

1. All reports to be presented to the conference shall be sent to the conference secretary, typewritten and in triplicate, on or before the date approved for such by the Coordinating Council and published in the conference calendar.
2. All resolutions to be presented to the annual conference affecting the structure, policy and function of any board or agency of the annual conference, shall be submitted in writing to the conference secretary with copies for all the delegates twenty-four hours prior to consideration by the annual conference, and not later than the second night session of the conference.
3. All motions presented to the annual conference, and amendments to any paper, shall be in writing (in triplicate) and placed in the hands of the conference secretary at the time of presentation.

IV. LAY DELEGATES TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

1. Lay delegates, regular and reserve, from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be elected by the Quarterly Conference at last forty-five days prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
2. Each district superintendent shall complete the list of lay delegates to the Annual Conference, from his district, at least forty-five days before the Annual Conference session, and shall immediately transmit the completed list, in triplicate, to the conference secretary.
3. Substitutions for lay delegates to the Annual Conference must be made in written form provided by the conference secretary, and must be approved and signed by the district superintendent. Such substitute delegates may function only in the absence of the regular delegates.

V. PASTORS' REPORTS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE: STATISTICS

1. Each pastor shall complete Table I of his annual report to the Conference, and transmit the same to the conference statistician at least two weeks prior to the opening date of the Conference.
2. Charge and church treasurers shall make final remittance for the current year to the conference treasurer on or before the opening date of the annual conference, and each pastor shall complete and submit Table II to the conference statistician on or before the opening date of the annual conference.
3. Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches with totals for the charge.
4. Table II shall be made out in even dollars only.
5. Tables I and II shall be printed in the Conference Journal with individual church reports and charge totals as compiled by the conference statistician from the pastor's reports.

VI. THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL

1. Editor: The conference secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing and making contracts for the publication of the Conference Journal, in keeping with the regulations of the General Conference and of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference. The editor shall have full authority to condense reports, memoirs, and other papers when necessary.
2. One complimentary copy of the Conference Journal shall be sent to each of the following: The conference claimants, the general boards, the publishing house, lay members of the conference boards, lay delegates to the Annual Conference, the educational and church-related institutions of the North Carolina Conference. The conference secretary shall have discretionary authority to send copies to such other educational institutions as he may deem advisable. Six copies shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at \$1.25 each, or single copies by mail at \$1.35 each. Monies accruing from the sale of Journal shall be deposited with the conference treasurer and credited to the Journal account.

VII. DISTRICTS

1. The number of districts shall be nine.
2. A district conference shall be held annually, in each district.
3. Each pastoral charge shall elect annually two lay delegates to the district conference. These shall be in addition to those named by the **Discipline** as ex officio members.
4. The district and associate district lay leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on nomination of the district superintendents and the conference lay leaders.
5. The district superintendent of each district shall be required to furnish to the bishop, the conference treasurer, and the conference statistician, as early in the year as possible an official copy of the apportionments to the charges for World Service and Conference Benevolences and the amounts accepted by the charges, also the amounts approved by the charges for the several items of ministerial support. The figures furnished the conference statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference. Two of these copies are to be sent to the secretary of the Commission on World Service and Finance.
6. Each district superintendent, as early in the year as possible, shall furnish the bishop, the conference treasurer, and the conference statistician with a schedule of the salaries of pastors as set by the Quarterly Conferences. The figures furnished by the district superintendent to the conference statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference.
7. We call attention of the district superintendents to Paragraph 432 (1) 1960 **Discipline**, and state that we believe that a reasonable time for such consultation, before the appointments are to be read, could not be construed to be less than twenty-four hours.

VIII. AMENDMENTS

1. These rules of order and procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day after a proposed amendment has been presented in writing; provided the rule fixing the number of districts may be amended by a majority vote; provided, further, a change in the number of districts may not be made later than the second morning of the Annual Conference session.

IX. WHEN THE RULES BECOME EFFECTIVE

1. These rules of order and procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference.

Minutes of the Special Session of the North Carolina Conference

Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church, Greenville, N. C.
Friday, September 9, 1960

MORNING SESSION

Opening: The North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, Southeastern Jurisdiction, convened in special session at Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church, Greenville, North Carolina, September 9, 1960 at 10:30 a. m., with Bishop Paul N. Garber, resident bishop, presiding. Hymn No. 32, "O For A Thousand Tongues to Sing," was sung, after which A. J. Lobbs, host district superintendent, led in prayer. The choir of the host church sang the anthem, "The King of Love My Shepherd Is," by Shelley.

Bishop Garber presented H. M. McLamb, host pastor, S. B. Underwood and Reynolds May, laymen of the host church. Mr. May spoke words of welcome, and made a statement concerning lunch.

Purpose of Special Session: Bishop Garber stated purpose of this special session, that is, to hear report of special committee named at the 1960 regular session of the conference to study plans for headquarters building or the housing of conference offices and agencies.

Method of voting: William Mills of Raleigh made a motion that all voting at this special session be by written ballot. It was seconded. The motion was lost.

Presentation of report: Bishop Garber presented Bill Price of Burlington, who, as chairman of the special committee, presided when the entire report was made. The following were called on by the chairman to present various phases of the report.

C. D. Barclift, chairman of the Conference Long Range Planning Committee presented the section of the report dealing with recommendations of the Long Range Planning Committee at the 1957, 1958 and 1959 sessions of the North Carolina Annual Conference. He then spoke to the conference.

O. L. Hathaway, chairman of the Headquarters Building Committee, reported on the work of the committee, showing the progress that had been made.

Charles W. Davis, architect, of Raleigh, was granted privilege of speaking to the conference. He then presented the architectural plans for the headquarters building.

H. Frank Faucette, Jr., certified property manager, of Raleigh, was granted privilege of speaking to the conference to explain the estimated operating budget.

Bill Price read letters from Mr. Lewis R. Holding, president of the

First Citizens Bank and Trust Company, of Raleigh. These letters, the first one read dated July 6, 1960 and the second dated July 5, 1961, were addressed to M. J. Cowell.

G. S. Garris of Troy was granted permission to speak to the conference. He spoke concerning central funds.

A. C. Edwards of Hookerton spoke to the conference on the progress of the building plans.

Bill Price then read the recommendations of the committee.

Registration: W. C. Wilson, conference secretary, made the motion that the registration cards be the record of attendance at this special session. The motion was seconded, and passed.

Bar of the Conference: H. M. McLamb made the motion that the sanctuary be the bar of the conference. The motion was seconded, and passed.

Majority report: The bishop announced that the majority report was before the conference.

G. S. Eubank offered a minority proposal, an alternate plan for the erection of a conference headquarters building.

E. C. Crawford spoke in favor of the alternate proposal.

Benediction: The conference adjourned for the noon recess at 12:45; and the benediction and grace for the meal were given by H. M. McLamb.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Opening: The special session of the North Carolina Conference convened for its afternoon session at 2:00 p.m. Hymn No. 220, "Majestic Sweetness Sits Enthroned," was sung. Prayer was led by A. P. Brantley.

At the adjournment of the morning session the alternate proposal was before the conference. The bishop called for a continuation of that proposal at the afternoon session.

A. D. Byrd, Jr. spoke in opposition to the alternate proposal.

C. L. Warren asked question regarding renting of property at end of twenty years. Bill Price answered the question.

Wiley Pickens of Raleigh was granted permission to speak. He spoke in favor of the alternate proposal.

A. J. Hobbs spoke against the alternate proposal.

G. S. Eubank made the motion that all speeches thereafter be limited to five minutes. The motion was seconded, and passed.

L. R. Sparrow spoke for the alternate proposal.

Marshall T. Spears of Durham was granted permission to speak to the conference. He spoke for the alternate proposal.

Previous question: T. W. Heath, Jr. of Kinston made a motion that the previous question be before the conference. The motion was seconded, and passed by more than a two-thirds vote.

Bishop Garber called on Bill Price as chairman of the special committee to make a final statement.

Written ballot: G. S. Eubank made the motion that the vote taken on the alternate plan be by written ballot. It was seconded, and passed.

Tellers: The conference secretary named the following as tellers: Leo

Thompson, James Auman, Leon Couch, Barney Davidson, John T. Maides, Robert McKenzie, Bob Morgan, and Troy Barrett.

Vote: The vote was taken, and the result was: for the alternate proposal, 189; against the alternate proposal, 211.



Appreciation: G. S. Eubank spoke words of appreciation, and pledged his support.


Announcements: L. C. Vereen, W. C. Wilson, O. L. Hathaway, Bishop Garber, and J. J. Rudin made announcements.

Petteway, secretary of the Commission, to speak to the report of the Commission. He moved the adoption of the report. G. S. Eubank moved the deletion of the second paragraph in the report. A. F. Opening: The Conference convened at 2:15 p.m. with Bishop Garber in the chair. Hymn No. 23, "Come Thou Fount" was sung. Prayer was led by Rev. Kenneth Haddock, of the Virginia Conference.

Presentation: W. C. Wilson presented Dr. C. D. White, secretary of the Western North Carolina Conference.

Commission on Christian Higher Education: V. E. Queen, chairman of the Commission, presided during the presentation of Christian Higher Education. He introduced Dr. Robert Parker, Executive Director, Commission on Higher Education, Virginia Conference, who brought an address on Christian Higher Education. The report was presented by A. P. Brantley, Executive Director of Christian Higher Education. He also an-

nounced some new scholarships, and two gifts of \$50,000 each to Methodist College and North Carolina Wesleyan College by the R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Company. The report was adopted.

D. D. Holt spoke concerning the College Sustaining Fund. W. L. Clegg spoke. H. G. Ruark moved that the following sentence in the report of the Commission be deleted:

"Therefore, we recommend that the College Sustaining Fund be adjusted so that it will reflect a redistribution of the United College Appeal Fund, which was a joint project with the Western North Carolina Conference, and on which the Western North Carolina Conference, stopped payments thereon three years ago."

W. L. Clegg spoke against the motion. The amendment was lost. The report of the College Sustaining Fund was adopted.

Presentation: Bishop Garber presented Rev. Jack Carroll, newly appointed Chaplain of Methodist students at Duke University. He is a member of the South Carolina Conference.

Solo: Mr. Henry Markot sang, "If With All Your Heart," by Mendelssohn.

Anniversary of Board of Christian Social Concerns: The anniversary of the Board of Christian Social Concerns was observed with C. S. Hubbard, chairman, presiding. Section I of The Division of Peace and World Order was considered first. Ralph Fleming presented three additions to this Section of the report.

Harmon Smith moved the deletion of word "Russian" and insert the word "others" in last sentence in first paragraph in Section I. The motion was carried.

Section II: The Division of Temperance and General Welfare was considered next. D. W. Charlton presented an amendment concerning cooperation with Allied Christian League. The chairman accepted the amendment.

Section III: Human Relations and Economic Affairs Division was considered. J. R. Regan, Jr. presented an amendment to Section III. It was accepted by the chairman. R. T. Osborn, Layman of Durham District, presented an amendment to Section III. Section III was adopted.

The entire report was adopted.

Henry G. Ruark, speaker for the Commission on Christian Social Concerns, addressed the Conference.

Board of Pensions: Bishop Garber presented Harold Staton, chairman, of Bethel. He spoke concerning the work of the Board. W. R. Stevens presented the report dealing first with Section I. He then presented Dr. Edge W. Gamble, General Board of Pensions, Chicago, who spoke to the Conference. Mr. David P. Harris, of Chicago, and a representative of the Travelers Insurance Company, spoke to the Conference concerning the plan of "Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program for Retired Ministers and their Dependents."

R. G. Dawson asked some questions, and Harold Staton answered them. M. C. Henderson asked question and Mr. Harris answered it. W. M. Jeffries asked a question, and Mr. Gamble responded. J. E. Garlington asked a question, and Harold Staton responded. E. C. Crawford spoke. W. R.

Stevens moved that Section I, down to last paragraph on page 80, Book of Reports, be adopted. It was adopted.

The second part of Section I (beginning with last paragraph, page 80, Book of Reports) was considered. W. R. Stevens presented Mr. Wyatt Dixon, Jr., who explained a Group Life Insurance Program to be underwritten by the Home Security Life Insurance Company of Durham, N. C. H. I. Glass asked a question, and Harold Staton responded. R. M. Gradeless asked a question, and Mr. Dixon responded. W. L. Clegg moved that the report be amended to defer the group insurance plan for one year so thorough study can be made by a committee appointed by the Bishop and that a member of the Board of Pensions be included on the committee. H. L. Smith spoke against the amendment. O. L. Hathaway spoke for the amendment. The motion carried, and the plan was deferred for one year.

W. R. Stevens moved that Sections II and III be adopted. They were adopted. With deletion of second section of Part I, the entire report was adopted.

W. R. Stevens made report of amounts to be received from the Ministers Retirement Fund by the ministers retiring this year.

Committee on Sustentation Fund: W. R. Stevens moved that the report of the Committee on Sustentation Fund be adopted. It was adopted.

Presentation: Bishop Garber presented C. M. Fogleman, Jr., of the Central Kansas Conference.

Announcements: Marvin J. Cowell and Bishop Garber made announcements.

Attendance: J. A. Auman announced the attendance for this session as follows: Ministers, 616; Laymen, 326; visitors, 84.

Benediction: B. L. Davidson gave the benediction.

THIRD DAY, EVENING SESSION

Wednesday, June 28, 1961

At 7:00 p.m. the church organist presented a fifteen-minute prelude, "Credo" by Haydn.

Opening: The conference convened at 7:15 p.m. The processional Hymn No. 401, "Lord of the Living Harvest" was sung. The scripture was read by Bishop Garber; and the evening prayer was led by Bishop Costen J. Harrell. The choir of Trinity Methodist Church rendered the anthem, "Gloria in Excelsis" by Mozart. The ordination sermon was preached by Bishop Walter C. Gum of the Louisville Area.

Love Feast: Beginning at 8:15 a.m. the annual Love Feast was held, with W. A. Cade presiding. Assisting in the service were J. L. Joyce, B. O. Merritt, L. M. Hall, B. B. Slaughter, and H. K. King.

Opening: The Conference convened at 9:30 a.m., with Bishop Paul N. Garber in the chair.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: Bishop Garber presented Mrs. H. C. Turlington, Conference president, who brought greetings from the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

Committee on Conference Entertainment: A. P. Brantley presented the report of the Committee on Conference Entertainment. He asked that Committee be granted another year for study. 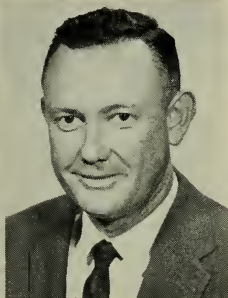

CARL ANDERSON JOHNSON

1918 — 1960

The Reverend Carl Anderson Johnson was born in Henderson, N. C., May 16, 1918, and died December 25, 1960, at Durham, N. C. Funeral rites were conducted at Carr Methodist Church where he had served as pastor during the last eighteen months of his life. Dr. C. D. Barclift, District Superintendent, was in charge of the service, assisted by R. W. Bradshaw and D. E. Earnhardt. Interment followed at Holly Springs, N. C.



Carl was the son of Carl and Margaret Dorsey Johnson. He married Miss Sally Crisp of Tarboro in November of 1942. Carl Anderson III and Sylvia Marina were born to this union. He received his early education in the schools of Fayetteville, N. C., where his father served as pastor of Person Street Methodist Church. From the Fayetteville schools he went to Louisburg College. He went to Wofford College to finish his A.B. work, and then went to Duke Divinity School where he received his B.D. degree.

Carl Johnson joined the North Carolina Conference at Raleigh in 1944. He was ordained Deacon in 1944 and Elder in 1946.

The first pastorate to which he was assigned was the Purlington Circuit. His charges in order after that were:

Siler City Circuit, South Mills, Cordova, Aberdeen and Carr Church, Durham. He led the people at Camp Springs on the Burlington Circuit in the building of a new church. At South Mills he built a Sunday school building and likewise at Newland's Church.

I was president of Louisburg College when Carl Johnson was there as a student. One of the first great problems he had to solve was how to finance his way through school. His parents had died and there was no one in sight who could sponsor his cause. His ability to stay there was soon manifest in his own determination, fearlessness, and adaptability.

At the Duke University Hospital where Carl went with his last illness he was given the hint by his physician that his ministry from the pulpit was done and that he had better consent to spend the balance of his time visiting within the hospital. He protested that he was first and foremost a preacher of the gospel and that the necessity was upon him to do that one thing even if it was without salary and without health.

So with that determination to fulfill his ministry Carl Johnson died. His ministry did not end that day, for "God may bury His work-men but He carries on His work."

ALBERT SIDNEY BARNES

1873 — 1961

Eighty-seven years ago on July 11, 1873, a child was born to Mr. and Mrs. Wiley Barnes of Wayne County, N. C. They named their son Albert Sidney. The child grew and became strong in body, alert and inquisitive in mind, and pure and noble in heart.



He attended the public schools of the county and in due course entered Trinity College where he graduated.

He heard and responded to God's call to the Christian ministry in the Methodist Church of the North Carolina Conference. He was admitted on trial at Kinston in 1896; was ordained Deacon in 1897, and Elder in 1900. He served five charges as pastor: Wilmington, Whiteville, Clinton, Oxford and Smithfield.

At this stage of his ministry he was called in 1915 to the superintendency of the Methodist Orphanage in Raleigh, now the Methodist Home for Children. Here he served with distinction for thirty-three years until 1948 when he retired. He was designated superintendent emeritus, and served the Home the remainder of his life as director of the student loan fund. Under his administration the Orphanage grew to be one of the top-ranking Homes for children in the country.

In due course he came to be affectionately known by the children and alumni as Daddy Barnes. Many are they who have been nurtured and brought up in this Home, and who have gone out to establish their own homes and to live honorable and useful lives as good citizens. He followed them in their careers, and was heard to say that his greatest pride was the record of his boys and girls after graduation, many of whom attained to places of honor and distinction.

Under his administration there was a splendid family atmosphere that characterized the home. It was truly Christian. Regular devotional services were held in the chapel in which the children and young people participated. Those who were old enough were taken to the city churches for Sunday services, most of them uniting with these churches on profession of faith at the appropriate age.

He knew the children by name, and they responded, as children will, to his expressions of paternal love and accepted eagerly every opportunity to sit on his knee in the office or hold his hands by every finger when walking across the campus. He also exercised appropriate discipline when necessary. A happy play life was provided and engaged in by all age groups.

Daddy Barnes also believed that growing boys and girls should acquire the knowledge and skills requisite for successful adult lives just ahead of them. Therefore an accredited school was conducted for all age groups. Chores were assigned to all according to their age in the dining room, the laundry, the dormitories, in keeping the beautiful campus and the operation of the dairy that supplied an abundance of good milk for the growing youngsters.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, March 22, at Edenton Street Methodist Church, Raleigh, with the pastor, Dr. Howard P. Powell, in charge, assisted by the Rev. W. A. Cade. Burial was in Oakwood Cemetery.

Alumni of the Methodist Home served as pallbearers. Honorary pallbearers were members of the Board of Trustees of the Home and the present superintendent, the Rev. R. L. Nicks.

Surviving are his wife, the former Daisy Wooten; one son, Speight Barnes of Tucson, Arizona; one daughter, Mrs. Maude Barnes Wells of Wake Forest; a step-son, Kendrick Smith of Butte, Montana; one sister, Mrs. Mamie Sauls of Wake Forest; two brothers, R. E. Barnes of Raleigh and Charles Barnes of Alexandria, Virginia.

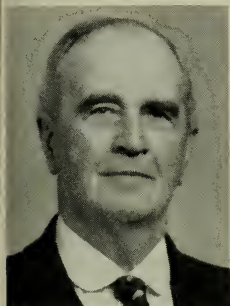

JAMES WILLIAM BRADLEY

1871 — 1961

James William Bradley, son of George Willis and Millie Ann Bradley, was born in McDowell County, North Carolina, November 24, 1871, and died March 28, 1961 after a long illness in the Glenwood Hills Nursing Home in Raleigh. Funeral services were conducted in the Hayes-Barton Methodist Church by Rev. Paul Carruth and Dr. W. L. Clegg. He was buried in Montlawn Memorial Park, Raleigh.



Brother Bradley grew up in the awareness that his mother gave him to the Lord before his birth; and during the eighteen years of his life before her death she instilled in her son the desire to become a minister of the gospel. To this high calling he devoted himself with complete dedication.

His paternal home was rich in Christian ideals and character, but poor in material wealth. A boy giving his life to the Christian ministry must be educated. So without money he went away to Weaverville College from which he graduated; earning his way by working, mostly by teaching in small rural schools in the summer.

His thoughts and interest went beyond himself to others. While at Weaverville he made it possible for a sister to attend one year. Later on in life he sent his own children through college; and during the years of his

long and fruitful ministry he encouraged many worthy and promising young people of his churches to acquire an education.

In 1899 Brother Bradley was admitted on trial into the Western North Carolina Conference where he served one charge, Bald Creek, before transferring to the North Carolina Conference. He was ordained Elder at Edenton Street Church, Raleigh, in 1904.

His ministry was characterized by the superb qualities of a good preacher of the gospel, a faithful and sympathetic pastor of his people, and careful attention to all the material obligations of his churches. He served the churches on the following pastoral charges in the North Carolina Conference: Troy, Rowland, Raeford, Lumberton, Hookerton, City Road in Elizabeth City, Asbury in Durham, Person Circuit, Siler City, Fairmont, Jonesboro, Zebulon, Princeton and Apex.

Brother Bradley was married to Miss Betty Lentz September 1, 1909. To them were born two children: J. W. Bradley, Jr., Raleigh, N. C., and Mrs. Beulah Bradley Cameron, Falls Church, Va. There are five grandchildren who will cherish the memory of a wonderful grandfather.

The ideals and quality of life that he set for himself, his children and the people he served are uniquely expressed in an essay he wrote April 12, 1900, entitled: "Traits of an Ideal Young Man," which follows:

"Man by nature and by God is king of the earth, created in His own likeness and commanded 'to multiply and replenish the earth and subdue it.' But how far short we fail to subdue the earth because of sinful and base men and women, and more especially the young men on whom rest the hope and destiny of our country.

"There are certain traits essential for an ideal young man to possess. Among the many are the following, viz:

"(a) He should be chaste in his conversation—not too talkative at any time, especially among his superiors—given to the use of plain, correct and proper words well studied and arranged into clear, concise sentences.

"(b) Back of all this there should be pure and chaste thoughts—an effort to let his aims, his aspirations, his goal to be high above the common rabble and bestial inclinations of depraved human nature.

"(c) His manners and general deportment, which is an index to his character, should be simple and natural, according to the best laws and custom and etiquette, not to be affected. He should be able to adapt himself to any company—not to aid or join in anything that has the appearance of evil, contract no bad or dissipating habits, but remaining pure and undefiled.

"He should be industrious, energetic, economical, truthful, honest, upright, trustworthy and self-sacrificing.

"(d) And above all, he should be strictly pious, love his church, his people, his country and his God. Be true to himself, to all mankind, and to God."

WILLIAM CHARLIE BAINES

1873 — 1961

William Charlie Baines was born December 10, 1873, in Nansemond County, Virginia, the son of the late Quinton and Carolyn Jones Baines. His early years were spent on his parents' farm. At eighteen he left home to work on neighboring farms. On March



7, 1895, he married the former Miss Rose Elva Ellis. They were blessed with fourteen children, all but one of whom survive: Mrs. Gracie Meads, Elizabeth City; Larry C. Baines, Suffolk, Va.; Mrs. Ruth Rogers, Craddock, Va.; Arthur Paul Baines, Elizabeth City; Marvin C. Baines, Norfolk, Va.; Mrs. Bertie Russell, Whaleyville, Va.; Mrs. Rosa Ella Hinnant, Micro; Ernest Baines, Elizabeth City; Mrs. Lillian Marie Lawrence, Fort Lauderdale, Fla.; Mrs. Dena Estelle Perry, Norfolk, Va.; Milton R. Baines, Baltimore, Md.; Wilbur Baines, Norfolk, Va.; and Mrs. Della Virginia Jackson, Virginia Beach, Va., and Fort Lauderdale, Fla. Their second child, Luther, lived only six months.

Converted in 1898, he joined Wesley Chapel Church of the former Methodist Episcopal Church in Whaleyville, Va. A year later he received his call to preach. In 1902 his local license to preach was issued in the Methodist Episcopal Church there in Whaleyville, in which

he assisted with revivals until his first episcopal appointment in 1903 to the three-church Rowland Circuit in Robeson County, N. C. He was ordained deacon in the Atlantic Mission Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church on October 22, 1905, by Bishop Earl Cranston at Parmele, N. C. In 1904 he was moved to the Bladen Circuit, where he served two years. While there he led in building one of the three churches and the parsonage. Then he served for a year the church on Harkers Island and traveled by boat to another one on Bogues Island. He returned to the Bladen Circuit in 1907 for another year and then went back to Harkers Island for the next. During this time he attended for a year the school of the Methodist Episcopal Church for ministerial training at Marshallberg and continued in the three-year course of study after leaving the locale. In 1909 he was appointed to Eureka Methodist Episcopal Church in Pasquotank County. While there he also commuted to the Parkville and Pleasant Grove Methodist Episcopal Churches in Perquimans County. He moved to Whaleyville, Va., in 1911 to serve Wesley Chapel Church and continued to hold services in the two churches in Perquimans County. From 1913 to 1915 he was minister of Eureka Church again but went out regularly to a church near Cannon Ferry in Chowan County and also to Pearl Street Methodist Episcopal Church in Elizabeth City. In 1915 he gave up the active ministry and took up farming in the Symonds Creek community of Pasquotank County, where he resided until his death. He continued preaching every week-end in the two Perquimans County churches for several years, until he retired. He transferred his membership to the Newbegin Methodist Church on January 2, 1947, where he taught Sunday school until his health failed him.

He was the first church member of the Pasquotank Charge whom I visited in the hospital. Upon subsequent visits there and in the home I found him a most devout Christian, a man of earnest prayer who gave a ready witness to his conversion experience and to the grace of God in his life.

Although he was in poor health for a long time, his last illness was very brief and his death rather sudden. Eighty-seven years old, he lay down this life's labors at 2:15 a.m., February 13, 1961, at his residence in Pasquotank County. He leaves his widow, thirteen children, two sisters, a brother, and numerous grandchildren and great-grandchildren. The funeral was held in the Twiford Funeral Chapel, Elizabeth City, at 2:00 p.m., February 15. The Reverend Robert S. Pullman, pastor, officiated, assisted by the Reverend R. L. Jerome, district superintendent, and by the Reverend A. Burgess, close friend and retired member of the Western North Carolina Conference who lives in the community. Burial followed in Westlawn Cemetery, Elizabeth City.

RICHARD BRAUNSTEIN

1891 — 1961

The Reverend Richard Braunstein, son of Adolph and Wilhelmina Prusser Braunstein, was born in New York City, September 10, 1891.

He became a member of his parents' church, Old Trinity Episcopal Church of New York City, and as a young man took college work at a school sponsored by that church.

From his church school he went to the Episcopal Seminary at Nashotah, Wisconsin, to prepare for the ministry. Later he continued his education at Bible Teachers College in New York City.

He was serving as assistant pastor of the Episcopal Church at Cairo, New York, when he was united in marriage, June 24, 1914, with Miss Aurelia Worth of Cairo, who now survives her husband.

Richard Braunstein was ordained a Methodist minister by the New York Conference in 1917. He first served the charge of Sharon, in Connecticut, from 1918-1923. In New York, he served the charges of Highland, 1923-1928; Goshen, 1928-1929; New Paltz, 1929-1931; and West Point, 1931-1935.

During the last year of his appointment at West Point, he became a chaplain in the United States Army where he attained the rank of Major during World War

II. His twelve years of duty in the Chaplains Corps, 1934-1946, carried him to various posts throughout the United States and finally brought him to Fort Bragg, N. C., where he assumed the reserve status and returned to the ministry of the local church as an accepted supply pastor in the North Carolina Conference.

His appointments were to the Shallotte Charge in 1946, to Hallsboro in 1949, to Whitakers in 1954, and to Middleburg, his last charge, in 1959.

Throughout the years of his service as chaplain and as pastor, Richard Braunstein broadened the scope of his ministry with constant writing of superior sermons and articles. He was editor of the youth page of the *Christian Herald*, 1923-1933, while he was a pastor in New York. During this period, he also published his first book, *The Bridge Builders*. He was a steady contributor of articles and sermons to *Zion's Herald*, the *New York Christian Herald*, the *Expositor*, and in the last few years to the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*. A second book, *Ventures in Faith*, was in preparation at the time of his death.

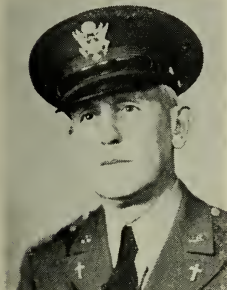
One of the ablest preachers to come to our conference, Brother Braunstein was a master of the spoken and written word. Through reading and study he achieved the rare combination of simple grace and profound thought which enables a man to present the truth with appeal and power, yet without display and sentimentality.

He was, above all, a man of marked and constant character. He had the serenity of the independent mind, the mind that has learned to live within itself. Although he was forthright and a man of conviction, he was tolerant, seeking to lead his people by inspiration and stimulation, for he was too broad to be dogmatic and too wise to be domineering. Ever aware of his calling to comfort, to encourage, and to guide others, he disciplined his life—as he did his writing and speaking—to a fundamental simplicity, sincerity, and dignity.

After an illness of only a few months, he died May 14, 1961, closing a fruitful ministry. His funeral service was conducted in his church at Middleburg by C. E. Vale, Elton Hendricks, and Graham Eubank, superintendent of the Raleigh District. The interment service was in Cairo, New York, the home of Mrs. Braunstein.

Even as he was very ill, he spoke of "waiting for a new assignment." The soldier has now been assigned a new post. The minister has gone to his latest appointment. His friends and fellow ministers can keep the memory of one who labored diligently, wrought faithfully, lived nobly, and who is ". . . still alive while . . . words do live, and we have wits to read and praise to give."

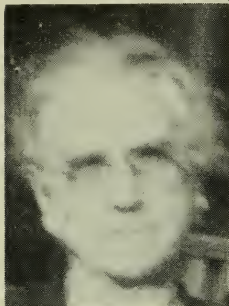

C., by the Reverend W. L. Clegg, district superintendent of the Burlington District, North Carolina Conference, assisted by the Reverend Phil H. Shore, pastor of the First Methodist Church, Lexington, N. C. Burial was in the Bethel Cemetery near Linwood, N. C.

Ernestine is survived by her husband, the Rev. J. H. Lanning, retired, Linwood, N. C., and by two children, Lucinda Adelaide Lanning, who is Resource Librarian at Statesville, N. C., and Jeremy Cushman Lanning, who is associated with the Columbia Broadcasting Company in New York City.

SECTION V

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

BURLINGTON DISTRICT

W. L. CLEGG, *District Superintendent*

The first year as superintendent of the Burlington District has brought satisfying and rewarding experiences. Having served as district superintendent of all the charges before (except the new churches recently established) when they were in either the Fayetteville or Durham districts, the renewal of fellowship with the churches in the district has been most enriching. We are greatly indebted to the many fine laymen throughout the district for their response to the work of Christ and His Church. Mr. Jimmy Rogers, the district lay leader, has given a great deal of time working with and advising the district superintendent. Along with his dedicated associate lay leaders, excellent results have been brought about in promoting Methodist Men's Clubs, the Every Member Canvasses, the Lay Rally, the No Silent Pulpit program, and the general work of the church.

There are forty-nine charges in the Burlington District. Twenty-one of these charges are served by student pastors. These, along with the 28 full-time pastors have provided dedicated leadership in the respective charges.

In the area of Christian Education we have made progress. The seven subdistrict Christian Workers Schools were not only well attended, but also the quality of work done was superior. A new Sunday school has been organized at Flint Ridge.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service, under the leadership of the district president, Mrs. George Ratterman, shows an increase in membership, giving, and service. Mrs. Ratterman is retiring as the district president and is being succeeded by Mrs. J. E. Davis of Steele Street Church, Sanford. The Woman's Society of Christian Service in the Burlington District is just what the name says it is. It is not just a WSCS. As Mrs. Ratterman points out, WSCS could stand for anything, for example, "We Serve Cole Slaw," but in the Burlington District it is the *Woman's Society of Christian Service*.

During the year a new church has been organized—St. Luke's in Alamance County. The organization of this new church was led by the student pastor of the Rock Creek Charge and the student assistant on the charge who is now the full-time pastor of St. Luke's. The new church has a membership of 90.

There has been improvement in church and parsonage properties. First Church, Graham, has paid off the indebtedness on the first unit of its lovely building and purchased a new parsonage. New parsonages have been erected on the Hightowers, Bellemont, Christ Church-Cedar Cliff, and Rock Creek charges. On the Bonlee charge there has been improvement on the Hope property, a new education building started at Providence, and the indebtedness on the parsonage has been retired. Plans are underway for an education building at Pleasant Hill on the Robbins Circuit. A new building has been completed and dedicated at Cool Springs on the Glendon Circuit. The education building at Bethel (Alamance County) was dedicated in January. A new education building and remodeling of the sanctuary has been completed at Bethlehem on the Goldston Circuit. The new building at Hickory Mountain on the Pittsboro Circuit is nearing completion. A new church is nearing completion at Concord on the Whitney Cross Charge and on the same charge Clover Garden and Orange Chapel churches have made improvements. The new sanctuary at Grace Church, Burlington, is under construction. Poplar Springs Church has completed and dedicated a new Fellowship Hall and the same thing at Jones Chapel on the Moncure Circuit. The first unit of the new church at Purley, on the Milton Circuit, has been completed and construction has started on the education building at Shady Grove on the Cobb Circuit.

At the time this report is written (May 29) there have been 439 additions to the church on profession of faith and 511 by transfer. Thirty-three charges report a net increase in membership, two charges report the same as last year, and fourteen charges report a decrease in membership. Every charge in the district reports additions by profession of faith.

We are looking forward to the special evangelistic endeavour for the coming conference year. We will hope, work, and pray that it will be a year in which every church on every charge will win souls for Christ and that there will not be a single church to report a decrease in membership next year.

DURHAM DISTRICT

C. D. BARCLIFT, *District Superintendent*

The progress on the Durham District reflects the effective work of the fifty-four dedicated pastors and the 22,850 loyal laymen.

Membership and Evangelism. Reports to date (May 21) show that 514 members have been received on profession of faith and 809 by transfer. A total of 226 infants have been baptized.

New Church. At the 1961 Annual Conference a pastor will be assigned to organize a new church in the Research Triangle area.

Circuits Divided. As of the 1961 Annual Conference the following circuits will be divided:

Bahama Circuit: Each of the three churches, Ellis Chapel, Mt. Bethel (Bahama), and Mt. Tabor, will become a station charge.

Eno-Palmer's Grove Circuit: Each of the two churches, Eno and Palmer's Grove, will become a station charge.

Christian Education. The church school enrollment is 15,225, a slight increase over the previous year. The average attendance is 8,834. With an enrollment of around fifty, a Sunday school has been organized at Mt. Tirzah Church, where there has not been one for a long time. This very old organization, which has never had anything but a one-room frame building, plans to construct an educational building soon. With good interest shown, Christian Workers' Schools were held in Bahama, Oxford, and Roxboro. The district-wide Youth Rally had large attendance. Vacation church schools were held in practically all the churches.

Lay Activities. There are twenty-five Methodist Men Clubs, with Union Grove, Orange County, being a new organization. Over seven hundred were present at the Layman's Rally held in February, and the lay speakers participated effectively in the No Silent Pulpit Program during Lent.

Woman's Society of Christian Service. There are seventy-seven Woman's Societies of Christian Service, including a new society at Stovall, and six Wesleyan Service Guilds, with a total membership of 3,659. Reports show a small increase in membership and a considerable increase in the pledge to missions. Much interest was manifested in the fall subdistrict meetings as well as the annual district meeting.

New Buildings. The following is a progress report on building projects during the conference year: Banks-Grove Hill, parsonage, completed; Bethesda, church, first unit, in planning stage; Brooksdale, educational building, completed; Concord-Oak Grove, parsonage, completed; Aldersgate (Durham), church sanctuary, in planning stage; Epworth, children's building, under construction; Glendale Heights, church, first unit, completed; St. Paul, educational building, completed; Wellons Village, church, first unit, completed; Ellis Chapel, parsonage, site donated; Lea's Chapel, fellowship hall and classrooms, completed; Mt. Tabor (from Bahama Circuit), parsonage, completed; Mt. Tirzah, fellowship hall and classrooms, construction to begin soon; Chestnut Ridge, church, completed; Hebron, church, construction to begin soon; Palmer's Grove, par-

sonage, completed; Pleasant Green, additional classrooms, completed; Cedar Grove (Chatham County), fellowship hall, in planning stage; and Union Grove (Orange County), fellowship hall, in planning stage.

ELIZABETH CITY DISTRICT

R. L. JEROME, *District Superintendent*

This has been a busy year on the Elizabeth City District. Our 39 pastors have kept at their task with commendable zeal and have received hearty co-operation and help from the laymen and laywomen in the 87 churches within the bounds of the district. Pastoral changes have taken place in four charges during the year: Kitty Hawk, Kinnakeet, Murfreesboro, and Ocracoke. The new pastors are fitting in well on our District Team. We are making plans to divide the Washington Circuit, with Asbury becoming a station and Wares and Wharton becoming a two-point charge. In spite of heavy sleet we went ahead with our District Conference and had about 100 who braved the elements to attend. We are continuing to publish the Elizabeth City District News and mail it out to about 1,400 subscribers 10 times a year, thus making it possible for us to promote the work directly among the officials of the charge.

So far we have received 517 into the church, 303 of them on profession of faith. Our pastors have held 69 revivals and have baptized 176 infants. The District Committee on Evangelism has conducted an over-night Day Apart for the pastors and had a District Evangelistic Rally in Plymouth on June 6 with Dr. Harry Denman as the preacher. Dr. Denman met with the pastors in a retreat prior to the Rally.

Our Sunday schools have enrolled 10,923 pupils. We have had several Christian Workers Schools in the district as well as vacation school institutes and workshops for training our personnel. Our Youth Council has planned a Youth Rally for September. Not enough of our people are reading our Methodist publications. We have only 475 subscribing to the *N. C. Christian Advocate*, 266 to *Together*, and 142 to *World Outlook*.

We try to keep the missionary emphasis before our people. We had a splendid Missionary Rally in Elizabeth City. We give some support to Mr. and Mrs. Jack Theis in Korea. We have 31 new members on the Ten Dollar Club.

We are continuing our emphasis on Christian Stewardship through Every Member Visitation Workshops which were held in four places in our district. Thirty-three of our churches report that they are putting on the Every Member Visitation this spring. The special offerings have been taken in our churches. The one that received the largest amount was the African Appeal with \$1,485 donated for this purpose. The next highest were for the Retirement Home with \$1,264 and the Rally Day offering with \$1,036. Nineteen charges have increased World Service and Conference Benevolences \$4,500, and thirteen charges have increased pastors' salaries \$7,500.

The laymen of the district have taken on new interest. The District Lay Leader, John Turner, and his associate lay leaders have served effectively in promoting the District Lay Rally with a good attendance, and the No Silent Pulpit program in which we had 100 certified lay speakers filling 184 engagements. Our laymen have 16 active Methodist Men's groups but need to extend this work. All of our churches except 8 have a Woman's Society of Christian Service. These women, under the leadership of Mrs. Joseph Bryant, carry on an active program across our large district.

We continue to build in the Elizabeth City District. We have dedicated the new church at Hatteras and the new educational building at Kitty Hawk with Bishop Garber present for these occasions. Classrooms at McBride, an organ at Stump Point, and parsonages at South Mills and Swan Quarter have also been dedicated. The Zion Church on the Gatesville Charge and the Buxton Church have been formally opened for worship. Educational buildings at Newbegun on the Pasquotank Charge, Oak Grove on the Perquimans Charge, Woodland on the New Hope-Woodland Charge have already been opened for use. Extensive improvements have been made on the building at Camden, An

educational building is under construction at New Hope on the New Hope-Woodland Charge. Plans are under way for new educational buildings at Mann's Harbor and at Bethany on the Chowan Charge, a fellowship hall at McBride on the South Mills Charge, church renovations at Stump Point, and a new parsonage for the Currituck Charge. The cost of buildings already completed is \$183,500, and the cost of buildings and improvements during the year has been about \$130,000.

It has been a joy to labor together with the faithful lay people and their pastors during this year. This is their report I am making, and it reflects credit upon them. For all that we have been able to do together we give God the glory and ask His blessings upon us as we seek to be "good ministers of Jesus Christ."

FAYETTEVILLE DISTRICT

MILLARD C. DUNN, *District Superintendent*

The district superintendent of the Fayetteville District is not unmindful of the fact that this is not his report, but the report of 59 dedicated and loyal preachers, and some 23,000 consecrated laymen and laywomen. I extend to each of them my sincere gratitude.

When the statistics for this report were compiled, immediately a comparison was made between them and the report last year at this time. It is a great source of pride to know that in all areas of our churches' program the Fayetteville District showed progress.

Membership and Evangelism: More than 1500 new members have been received into our churches this year: 659 on profession of faith and 850 by transfer. This is some 200 more than were received last year. Losses by death, transfer, and corrected rolls amounted to 953.

Christian Education: We have followed the leadership of our North Carolina Conference Board of Education as fully as we know how; consequently, seminars, workshops, Bible studies, Christian Workers' Schools, and Vacation Church School Institutes were held throughout the district.

Missions and Church Extensions: It seems that we in the Fayetteville District have developed the habit of sending a young couple each year to some mission field. Three years ago it was Seavy Carroll and his wife to Africa; last year it was Rene O. Bideaux and his wife to Costa Rica; and this year it was Jack Martin and his wife to Alaska.

Our pastors report 338 active members of the \$10.00 Club.

New Buildings and Improvements: The Fayetteville District is fast becoming a district of great churches and beautiful parsonages.

Four new parsonages have been built and occupied this conference year at an estimated value of \$85,700.00. These parsonages have been built at Cumberland, St. Andrews, Bladen Charge and the Pekin Charge. The congregation at Gardners' Chapel bought a new home for its parsonage. Christ Church bought the Tally home, relocated it, and renovated it completely. It now has an estimated value of \$31,500.00

The beautiful sanctuary of the Central Church, Laurinburg, was dedicated on October 9, 1960. The parsonage at Vass was dedicated on May 14, 1961. The Saint John's church school building was dedicated Sunday, June 4, 1961, and the Norman parsonage on June 11. The Candor parsonage is free of all debt and will be dedicated this coming conference year. The West Rockingham Methodist Church is also debt-free and will be dedicated soon.

The St. Matthew congregation moved into its new sanctuary on Palm Sunday of this year. Culbreth Memorial congregation moved into its new building June 1, 1961. Johnson Memorial relocated its church during the year. Trinity Methodist, Red Springs, will move into its new sanctuary in the next few weeks. Members of Snead's Grove Methodist Church occupied their new sanctuary the first of January, 1961. Plans are under way for new church school buildings at Trinity, Troy; Biscoe; Laurel Hill; First Church, Hamlet; Vass; and Camp Ground.

Lay Activities: Our district lay leader, Mr. Raymond E. (Buddy) Luper, and his associates have given to our district efficient and consecrated leadership. One hundred and fifty lay speakers under their direction carried out a very effective "no silent pulpit" program. Our lay rally at Hay Street was most successful with more 1,000 laymen attending. There is continued progress among our men in evangelism, missions, and stewardship.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: Under the able leadership of their district president, Mrs. H. R. Odom, our women continue to render an excellent service. They are 100% organized in the churches of the district and have as their goal 100% in enrollment of the women. Reports show a large increase in both membership and giving to missions.

Finances: The total money raised in the district this year will be in excess of \$1,250,000. Next year there will be an increase in pastors' salaries of more than \$14,300 and an increase in benevolences of about \$9,000.

We give thanks to God for the dedicated pastors and laymen of the Fayetteville District who made this report possible.

GOLDSBORO DISTRICT

M. W. LAWRENCE, *District Superintendent*

The report of the Goldsboro District is a thrilling story written by fifty-seven faithful ministers and almost 20,000 laymen. In this report we cannot overlook the foundations laid by my predecessor, Rev. H. M. McLamb, who labored faithfully and tirelessly on the district. Some of the highlights of the work are these:

Membership and Evangelism: This year 1,099 persons were received into our church through Mother's Day. Of these 509 came by profession of faith, making a net increase of 460 for the year. One hundred and nine revivals were held in the 104 churches. One hundred and eighty babies were baptized. Many of our churches have prayer groups.

Education: Our church school enrollment has increased by more than 500, and attendance is up also. Four subdistrict schools for Christian workers were held. Two fine youth rallies were held. More than 60% of the pledges to the College Capital Campaign Funds have been paid.

Missions: Our Women's Society of Christian Service has given good support to the program of the church. One new society was organized at Zion on the Seven Springs Charge. The highlight of the year was the commissioning of Rev. and Mrs. George Megill at St. Luke on Sunday, June 5, by Bishop Cyrus B. Dorsey of Brazil. The Megills will go to Brazil in August, and many of our churches will help to support his work. There are 59 new members in the Ten Dollar Club. All of our charges have conference specials and many others national and general specials.

Lay Activities: Under the leadership of our District Lay Leader, Robert C. Rose, and his associates, the lay work has progressed. The district was represented by 43 laymen at the Lay Retreat at Duke last August, and 624 attended the Lay Rally in February. St. Luke held a lay retreat one week end with about 20 men present. One hundred and eighty-seven lay speakers spoke effectively during the "No Silent" Pulpit program. Many of our churches have put on the Every Member Visitation program with some thrilling victories being reported. There will be a substantial increase in pastor's salaries and in World Service and benevolences as a result of this program.

Buildings and Improvements: Great strides have been made in improving the physical properties in the district.

Dedicated this year were the sanctuary and organ at Newton Grove, the educational building, social hall, and parsonage at St. Luke, and the educational building at Andrews (Salemberg Chapel), chapel at Warsaw.

Under construction at the present time are facilities valued at more than a quarter

of a million dollars—an educational building at Wallace (\$88,500), three more Sunday school rooms at Brogden; a sanctuary and five additional rooms at St. Luke (\$105,000), and parsonages at Smithfield (air-conditioned), Lucama, Hopewell-Mt. Moriah, and Browning-Smith.

The renovations include the enlarging and brick veneering of Rones, the brick veneering and furnishing Keener (\$33,000), Epworth and McGee (Clinton Circuit), the parsonage at Warsaw, and air-conditioning the church at Smithfield.

Plans for the immediate future call for educational buildings at Kenly, Bethel (Beston-Bethel Charge), Hickory Grove, Providence, and six more rooms at Jefferson (one of our fast-growing suburban churches) and a sanctuary at Fellowship Church.

During the year more than \$134,000 was raised on indebtedness and more than \$156,000 for buildings and improvements, and the end is not in sight.

Charge Division: One of our two four point charges, Wesley, is being divided, forming the Hopewell-Mt. Moriah Charge and the Wesley-Black's Charge. The Garris-Jerusalem Charge is divided temporarily, forming two small stations. There will be 59 charges in the district next year.

It has been a good year. The preachers and laymen have been patient with and understanding of their new superintendent. It has been a real joy to work with these fine people, and the credit for our achievements go to them.

NEW BERN DISTRICT

A. J. HOBBS, *District Superintendent*

Fifty-two loyal pastors and 21,000 Christian laymen have co-operated to make the Conference year 1960-1961 one of great achievement for our New Bern District.

Membership and Evangelism: Beginning with our Pastors' Retreat early in the year, we have continued our efforts to win people to Christ and His Church. Six hundred have been added by baptism and vows and 600 by transfer, for a total of 1,200. The net increase is 446.

Christian Education: Our Church School enrollment is 16,727, a small increase over last year. First Church, Morehead City, sponsors a summer Church School at Atlantic Beach, with an average attendance of 70. We shall be on the alert to start outpost church schools whenever and wherever possible.

Lively interest is maintained in the College Capital Fund Campaign, and payments continue to come in from the pledges made by pastors and laymen.

Lay Activities: Under the guidance of District Lay Leader Roy L. Turnage, Jr., our laymen have rendered effective service. Two hundred lay speakers are available to fill pulpits any time, anywhere. To learn more about the Church and its work, hundreds of our laymen have attended and participated in district and conference meetings.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: The Woman's Society of Christian Service, true to its name, continues consistently loyal, giving an inspiring example to individuals and groups as they press forward diligently with their vital program. The district is completely organized.

Buildings and Improvements: The Orina Kidd Garber Education Building, the first unit of our new Garber Church, has been completed at a cost of \$70,000. It was formally opened February 19, 1961, with a sermon by Bishop Paul N. Garber.

The Harlowe-Oak Grove Charge has built a new parsonage valued at \$15,500. Cherry Point Church has purchased a new parsonage valued at \$15,500.

Westminster has completed a \$60,000 addition to the education building.

Camp Glenn, Northwoods, and Queen's Creek churches will soon be ready to begin construction on new church buildings.

Benevolences accepted: For the year 1961-1962 our churches have increased their benevolence acceptances by \$7,527.

Pastors' salaries: Increase in pastors' salaries for the new year is \$7,600.

RALEIGH DISTRICT

GRAHAM S. EUBANK, *District Superintendent*

Every year on the Raleigh District becomes more rewarding and the District Superintendent is thrilled and inspired by pastors and people who express their dedication in service to Christ and His Church.

Membership and Evangelism: The district continues to grow in membership. Six hundred forty-eight have been received on Profession of Faith; 841 by transfer from other Methodist churches; 290 from other denominations, for a total of 1,779 additions.

Two hundred eighty-one infants have been baptized; 86 revivals have been held; and 51 charges participated in the simultaneous visitation program.

Christian Education: There have been five Christian Workers' Schools held; a Vacation Church School Institute; and Vacation Church Schools in practically all of our churches. Subdistrict groups are active. Children, youth and adults from all subdistricts participate in the Christian Adventure Camps, Youth and Young Adult Assemblies and other conferences.

The churches observed Church School Rally Day, Race Relations Sunday, and Methodist Student Day. Offerings totaled: Church School Rally Day, \$1,515; Race Relations, \$611; Camp Kerr Lake, \$2,152; Methodist Student Day, incomplete.

Church School enrollment and average attendance have increased.

Missions and Church Extension: Interest is increasing in missions in the Raleigh District. Almost every church in the district has had at least one School of Missions this year. Pastors report 125 new members of the \$10 Club and 328 subscribers to *World Outlook*.

The Raleigh Board of Missions continues to give leadership and financial support to church extension in the Raleigh area. One new church has been organized in Raleigh this year, with a membership of 69. A new church will be organized in Cary next year. This church is being sponsored by the Conference Board of Missions and the First Methodist Church of Cary.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild provide information, education and support for Missions. Pledges to the Woman's Division increase every year. Both the Annual Conference of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild met in our district this year. Edenton Street was host to the Wesleyan Service Guild and Hayes Barton was host to the Woman's Society of Christian Service. It was a real honor to have these groups hold their annual meetings in our district.

Lay Activities: The laymen of the Raleigh District under the leadership of our able lay leader, W. D. Payne of Henderson, and his associates, have been very active. Our Lay Rally was probably the best ever held in the Raleigh District with the largest attendance and an excellent program. The No-Silent-Pulpit program was excellent. The speakers were well received in the churches they visited. Under the leadership of Mr. Payne and his associates, a number of our laymen have been conducting training sessions for the Every Member Canvass program. Forty-one charges have conducted the every member visitation this spring.

Their leadership has stimulated an increase in giving to our church. This is shown in the almost \$18,000 increase in acceptance in World Service and Conference

Benevolence for this year. The churches' acceptance for next year will again be larger than the apportionment to the district. At this time an increase of approximately \$14,000 has been accepted by the charges, making a total of over \$191,000. Fifty-seven of the 63 charges have accepted an increase for next year.

Offerings for special days and causes have increased, amounting to \$17,374, with more to report.

The increase in Christian stewardship is also shown in the increase in pastors' salaries. Thus far 43 charges have increased pastors' salaries by \$15,565 for next year.

Buildings and Improvements: A new church building has been constructed at Union on the Mamers Charge at the cost of \$40,000. The unusual thing about this building is that it was paid for when it was completed and has already been dedicated.

Wynnewood Park Church in Raleigh is now under construction and will be completed by the first of August. Cokesbury and St. James churches in Raleigh have building plans and will begin the construction of their first units by next fall. Construction on a new church at Macedonia was started recently. Divine Street Church in Dunn plans complete renovation of the church and the construction of an educational building to begin in September.

Three dedication services were held in Henderson on May 21 with Bishop Garber dedicating a new educational building at First Church and church buildings at Wesley and City Road.

New parsonages were built at Norlina, Trinity in Raleigh and Zebulon. New parsonages have been purchased in Raleigh by Cokesbury, Hayes Barton, Layden Memorial, and Wynnewood Park, and also a new district parsonage. Vance Charge has also purchased a new parsonage. A new parsonage is now being built by Plank Chapel Church in Vance County.

A total of \$195,651 has been paid on parsonages during this year. A total of \$156,278 has been paid on church buildings and improvements; \$244,794 has been paid on indebtedness.

Two charges have been divided: (1) Erwin and Parker's Grove each becoming a station; and (2) Garner Circuit forming a station and one two-point charge.

With a new church in Cary next year, the total number of pastoral charges for the district will be increased to 66.

ROCKY MOUNT DISTRICT

WALTER C. BALL, *District Superintendent*

I deem it an honor and privilege to make to the North Carolina Annual Conference the fifth annual report for the pastors, laymen and women of the Rocky Mount Methodist District. Without the support of these good men and women any report made would be empty.

Christian Education: a. Our people have been very responsive this year to the program of Higher Christian Education. Pledges made to our colleges continued to be paid and the district is among the top ones in amount pledged and percentage paid. Some additional gifts have been received for this purpose—among them \$1,000.00 through the Smith Church at Roanoke Rapids for our colleges.

b. Leadership Schools have been fruitful. Vacation Bible Schools have been effective, and the effort on the part of our Sunday School workers has resulted in more than 1,100 new members being added to our Church School rolls this year.

c. The program for our young people through the leadership of Arnold Pope has gone forward well. We have a very fine group of young boys and girls in the Rocky Mount District and they show great promise of leadership for the future years ahead.

Evangelism: The Reverend W. J. Neese, our pastor at First Church, Roanoke Rapids, and his fine district staff of workers have planned and led our people well in the various programs of Evangelism this year. More than 1,000 new members by Baptism and Certificate have come into our churches. There have been more than 200 babies baptized

this year and the names of these have been added to our preparatory rolls. While we would be deeply grateful to have had more new members added to our rolls, our pastors have been effective in holding Revival Services in all of our churches. The result of these services, aside from the members we have received, has been effective in spiritual preparation for further work in the field of Evangelism.

Missions and Church Extension: We have had this year a renewal in interest on the part of our people in Missions and Church Extension. At many of our Quarterly Conferences this report has been very significant. There has been an expansion in our specials and gifts to the cause of Christ through Missions and Church Extension, which is noticeable. Perhaps, as in other areas of our conference, for this great work we need imagination, dedication and more money to push the cause.

Finance: At the close of our last Annual Conference for 1960, we were pleased that the people of the Rocky Mount District has paid on their apportionments 99% of their acceptances. At present we are in the most important month of the conference year in bringing into full fruition our work in finances for the whole district. The results thus far towards a high percentage payment of all of our acceptances, together with new increases for 1961-62, look very bright.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: Again this year all of us are indebted to Mrs. E. K. Adkins of Robersonville and her fine district leaders for the excellent record achieved among our women. Through their consecration, dedication and work, every phase of their program has moved forward. As always, the women have not only been effective in their field of work, but they have been most helpful in sharing the whole program of the church in the Rocky Mount District.

Laymen: This year Mr. J. P. Woodard, our District Lay Leader, with his district helpers, has been busy and successful. A renewed effort in stewardship through the Every Member Canvass has been promoted. A number of new congregations among the many churches of our district have been added to the group already making annually such a canvass. The laymen have been effective in the Men's Rally, in their work in the clubs and in the full participation in the "No Silent Pulpit" program.

Building and Repairs: We are constantly alert to the building of new churches and parsonages and the repairs of those we already have in the Rocky Mount District. Although many of our churches and parsonages have been extensively repaired and refurnished, space allows me only the opportunity to mention the new sanctuaries and parsonages which have been built or are now under construction. A complete new sanctuary is under construction for our Marvin Church in Rocky Mount and, also, a new sanctuary and Sunday School rooms are replacing the old Bethlehem Church on our Wesley Memorial Charge. Woodland and Milwaukee have built new parsonages. Englewood and West Nash churches both have purchased new homes for parsonages, and the Burlington Industries, Inc. has given to the Hart Church in Tarboro a nice house for its parsonage, and there is under construction a beautiful, new parsonage in Spring Hope for the Nash Circuit.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

J. E. GARLINGTON, *District Superintendent*

The pastors, laymen, and laywomen of the Wilmington District are to be commended for the fine work they have done for Christ and His Church this year. More and more our people are thinking of the total program of the Church. It has been a real joy to be associated with such a faithful group of people. Between three and four hundred of our people, of whom a large percentage were leaders, moved with the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad. This was a loss of approximately \$40,000 to our budgets in Wilmington. Our people have not used this loss to hind behind nor have they shirked their duty. These churches have held the line and not one dollar has been cut from our benevolences. (In difficult times the Church always rises to its best.)

Evangelism: 880 people united with our Church this year. Four hundred and twenty-nine came on profession of faith and 451 came by transfer. Eighty-nine of our people were called to our Father's home and 653 transferred their membership. Of the great number that moved to Jacksonville only one transferred to a church other than the Methodist and this person was originally a member of another denomination.

Dedications: The beautiful church at Lumberton was dedicated in December. Three small churches have performed a heroic task in building and dedicating educational buildings. They are: Watha on the Burgaw Charge, Buie on the Pembroke Charge, and First Church, Pembroke. It is a thrilling experience to dedicate a building where fifty or sixty people have worked hard to provide adequate facilities for their community.

Paid on Indebtedness: 28 churches have paid \$115,825 on their building debts.

E.M.C.: More than 60 percent of our charges are putting on the E.M.C. program.

Church School: Fifteen charges report an increase in attendance.

New Building Programs: Hallsboro is spending \$25,000 for additional educational facilities. Prospect is spending \$35,000 for similar facilities. Burgaw is planning a \$60,000 educational unit and Bethesda is spending \$40,000 for expanded services. Rocky Point will spend \$11,000 for classroom space and Rowland will spend \$20,000 for a new parsonage. A contract for \$36,000 has been let to begin a new church in Pine Valley.

Benevolence Increase: We have increased our benevolences approximately \$4,000 and at same time there has been approximately \$11,000 increase in salary for the ministers.

REPORT OF APPROVED SUPPLY PASTORS' SCHOOL

The thirteenth annual school for Approved Supply Pastors is scheduled to be held at Duke University during the period July 17 through August 11, 1961. This school is sponsored by the Divinity School of Duke University, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, Annual Conferences in the Southeastern Jurisdiction, the Department of Ministerial Education, and the In-Service Training, Board of Education of The Methodist Church. The full course of study as approved by the General Conference of 1960 will be offered, and one complete year's work can be done.

The Duke Supply Pastors' School is one of several schools conducted by The Methodist Church for clergymen who are required to take the Methodist Course of Study. The annual enrollment is approximately 225; and while the majority of the students come from the two annual conferences in North Carolina, a large number come from conferences in Virginia, West Virginia, Tennessee, South Carolina, Florida and a few other states. In addition to the required courses, the daily schedule of the school includes workshops and discussion groups on the care of the parish, preaching, hymnody, hospital visitation, and working with alcoholics. Daily services of worship are held in Duke Chapel.

The faculty for the 1961 school will be composed of the following instructors: C. D. Barclift, David G. Bradley, W. L. Clegg, Leon Couch, Boyd Daniels, Frederick Herzog, O. Kelly Ingram, W. A. Kale, S. T. Kimbrough, Jr., Thomas A. Langford, McMurry S. Richey, John J. Rudin, and Kenneth M. Taylor.

Scholarship funds for men from the North Carolina Conference have been provided by the Commission on World Service and Finance, and these are made available on endorsement of the Conference Board of Ministerial Training.

REPORT OF THE BISHOP'S COMMITTEE ON CHURCH ARCHITECTURE OF THE N. C. CONFERENCE

The present membership of the Bishop's Committee on Church Architecture of the North Carolina Conference is composed of the nine district superintendents; ten other ministers and one layman, whose areas of specialized work deal frequently with church architecture; eleven architects; the Reverend M. Wilson Nesbitt, associate director of the work of the rural church under The Duke Endowment; and R. E. DuMont, Treasurer, The Duke Endowment.

The committee continues to recommend that all churches planning a building program do these things:

1. Secure architectural advice in the preliminary phases of the project.
2. Counsel with Mr. Nesbitt, Duke University, Durham, and the Reverend O. L. Hathaway, Executive Secretary, North Carolina Conference Board of Missions.
3. Familiarize themselves with the requirements in paragraph 180, 1960 *Discipline*, which details the responsibility and participation of the district superintendent, pastor, District Board of Church Location and Building, quarterly conference, church conference, and the building committee.

While the committee is interested in church architecture in general, its chief interest is in the direction of improving the architecture of rural Methodist churches, and it believes that definite progress is being made to this end.

The quarterly meetings of the committee have been held at Duke University with excellent attendance. The March meeting was held jointly with a similar committee from the Western North Carolina Conference. Dr. Glenn Gothard, General Board of Education, The Methodist Church, Nashville, Tennessee, spoke to this joint meeting on Church Architecture. For several days following, he held consultation seminars throughout the Conference with pastors and laymen from churches interested in building programs.

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE BROTHERHOOD

The Brotherhood is a group of Methodist ministers and lay people who want to express their sympathy to the bereaved widow of a Methodist minister in a way that will be of real assistance when it is most needed. Instead of sending telegrams or flowers, members of the Brotherhood send money; gifts of \$1 by superannuate ministers and lay people; \$3 by ministers in active service whose salary is under \$3,000; \$4 if the salary is from 3,000 to 4,000; and \$5, if above \$4,000. This money is sent by the treasurer as soon as the death is reported to him, and the widow has the needed money to pay funeral expenses even before she receives any money from insurance. This is not an insurance company. It is a fellowship, a brotherhood.

The membership is made up of 294 beneficiary (ministers) and 212 non-beneficiary (lay) members, a total membership of 506. We express our appreciation to the lay people who are members of the Brotherhood. Their support has meant much to the Brotherhood, and we hope many more will join.

The following calls were made this year: 170—C. A. Johnson; 171—A. S. Barnes; 172—J. W. Bradley. Each widow or family received a sum of \$1,400.00.

Article 10 of the Constitution of the Brotherhood states: "Any minister of the N. C. Conference on Trial or in Full Connection, or any accepted supply pastor doing supply

work in the Conference, may become a beneficiary member of the Brotherhood by payment of an Initiation Fee of \$1, and within 30 days from the date of entrance a Mortuary Assessment of \$3, if salary is under \$3,000; \$4 if salary is from \$3,000 to \$4,000; and \$5, if salary is \$4,000 or above; provided that, if he has served as a clerical member one year or more, the initiation fee and mortuary assessment shall be as follows:

(The table may be projected at the same method of progression to determine initiation fee and mortuary assessment of a minister with any number of years beyond eight.)

Article 7 of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Brotherhood reads: "A member who shall fail to pay any assessment due, as aforesaid, within thirty (30) days from the date of notice shall forfeit his membership in the Brotherhood; provided, that any member forfeiting his membership under this Article shall be readmitted to the Brotherhood upon payment of all arrears: provided, further, that if a member shall die before the next session of the Annual Conference, and his beneficiaries should at said session pay all arrears, the treasurer shall call an assessment on account of his death."

We hope each member of the Brotherhood will pay his assessments when the notice is sent out so that the beneficiaries may be paid promptly and when they need it. Your co-operation is necessary.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

DIVISION OF PEACE AND WORLD ORDER

During the past year the Division of Peace and World Order has undertaken several projects including:

1. Sending the vice-chairman of the division to a Methodist United Nations Seminar in New York City.
2. Co-sponsoring with the Board of Education, the Conference MYF Citizenship Chairman to the National Methodist Youth Washington-United Nations Seminar.
3. Working co-operatively with the Conference MYF Council and the Methodist Student Movement of N. C. in promoting the cause of Peace and World Order through their conferences and assemblies.

For the coming year this Division plans to:

1. Co-sponsor with the N. C. Council of Churches, the American Freedom Association, and the Division of Peace and World Order of the Western N. C. Conference, the Eighth Annual Southeastern World Affairs Institute at Blue Ridge, N. C. Scholarship assistance will be offered 4 persons in our Conference; an MYF leader, a layman, one minister and one college student.
2. Send out mailing to pastors and local church chairman of the Commission on Christian Social Concerns, urging active support and promotion: of World Order Sunday, October 22, 1961. United Nations Day, October 24, 1961. The United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund (UNICEF) at Halloween, October 30, 1961.
3. Co-operate with the other Division of the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns in conducting 3 Tridistrict training workshops for pastors and local church chairman Social Concerns, to be held in the fall.
4. Co-sponsor with the Methodist Student Movement of N. C. a United Nations Model Assembly to be held at the Wesley Foundation Headquarter at Fairmont Methodist Church in Raleigh, October 27-29, 1961.
5. Offer 2 conference scholarships for a minister and layman to attend one of the Methodist U. N. Seminars at the United Nations in New York.
6. Sponsorship of a Conference on Peace and World Order to be held at St. Paul's Methodist Church, Goldsboro, 10 a.m.-3:30 p.m. February 8, 1952. The theme will be this year's quadrennial emphasis in Christian Social Concerns, "World Peace—Key to any Future." Dr. Henry Hitt Crane will speak and members of the National Staff of the Division of Peace and World Order will serve as resource leaders.

7. We are encouraged by the interest of the President of the United States in Disarmament. We pray that he will continue his resolution to negotiate with great patience towards this end. We look forward to the formation of a significant, permanent Disarmament Agency in the Government. In spite of other intransigence and seeming disinclination to negotiate with sincerity, we must steadfastly continue our negotiations.

8. We commend the President of the United States for the establishment of the Peace Corps to serve in what the President has described as "the great common task of bringing to man a decent way of life which is the foundation of freedom and a condition of peace." In many areas of the world there are large populations that are illiterate, untrained, unskilled, and undernourished. They are willing and anxious to be taught how to manage for themselves. In many cases they have natural resources, but they need to be taught how to develop them. They are awakening to the possibilities of their own development. They desperately need help. We, in turn, have in this country many men and women with the necessary abilities who with proper training could provide the skilled leadership for these emerging peoples. Our government is in a unique position to match their need for service with our need to serve. We wish to assure the President of our desire to help recruit qualified Christian volunteers for service in the Peace Corps. We will support the government's efforts in this direction and we look forward to being kept informed of the plans for the Peace Corps and the ways in which the Methodist Church, with its experience in many of the areas to be served, may cooperate.

We recommend that the action of this conference in support of the foregoing amendment be communicated to the President of the United States and to Sergeant Shriver, the Director of the Peace Corps.

9. By the providence of God the United States has been given the stewardship of approximately one-half of the world's income. Jesus Christ has commanded his stewards to feed all his sheep. In obedience to this commandment the General Conference of the Methodist Church in its 1960 session gave its endorsement to the principle of foreign aid and to those specific principles which characterize the foreign aid program recommended to the Congress of the United States by President Kennedy. Among the specific principles, as stated by the General Conference, are: 1. That foreign aid would "seek to make the benefits of scientific advance and industrial progress available for the improvement of underdeveloped areas." 2. That "all programs of technical assistance and economic aid should be designed to benefit the people of underdeveloped countries and their economies rather than to serve political or military purposes." 3. That "for maximum effectiveness, it is important that these programs be on a long range basis."

We therefore recommend that this conference, in support of the General Conference and in obedience to Christ, endorse the foreign aid program recommended to the Congress by the President.

We further recommend that this conference send telegrams to Senators Sam J. Ervin, Jr., and B. Everett Jordan urging their support of the President's program.

Finally, we recommend that the ministers of the North Carolina Conference be urged to put the matter of foreign aid before their congregations, both from the pulpit and through the work of the Commission on Christian Social Concerns of the Local Church.

DIVISION OF TEMPERANCE AND GENERAL WELFARE

The Division of Temperance and General Welfare reports that Commitment Sunday 1960 produced the following results.

1. First commitments 1,582
2. Renewal commitments 3,086

3. Family covenants 635

One hundred forty-nine reported observance of Commitment Day, a percentage of 33.5% of all charges.

The division believes that a better observance of Commitment Day may result if the service is benefited by new concepts such as an altar call to take the place of the signing of commitment cards. We suggest that each local minister work with his Commission on Christian Social Concerns to promote Commitment Sunday in the best and most effective way to suit the local church. We further suggest that if any minister finds a conflict between Commitment Sunday and the first Sunday in Advent that the Sunday following Thanksgiving, November 26, be observed as Commitment Sunday for the year 1961.

We commend the Commission on Missions and the Woman's Society of Christian Service for the study this past year on "Alcohol and Christian Responsibility," and believe that continuing effective work will result if the work of the Woman's Society, Secretary of Christian Social Relations, and the Commission of Christian Social Concerns is more close correlated within the local church and on the conference level.

We take this opportunity to encourage our ministers to attend the Keeley Institute Training Course for work with alcoholics. During the coming conference year eight full scholarships for this purpose will be offered. Information can be obtained from your Conference Commission of Christian Social Concerns.

We commend those local churches who have offered their facilities to Alcoholics Anonymous groups in their communities.

2

We commend the use of such facilities as the Good Shepherd's Home, Lake Waccamaw, and the State Rehabilitation Agency at Butner, as referral centers for alcoholics.

We advise continued cooperation with the Committee on Alcoholism of the North Carolina Council of Churches and the Christian Action League. We commend the educational approach to the alcohol problem, with the use of such materials as turnover charts and films, available in our conference film library.

Besides the use of these facilities with church groups, we find that public school principals and teachers will often co-operate by showing them in the classrooms. Civic clubs also use them.

Finally, we urge that appropriate local option legislation be supported and national legislation to ban the sale and service of alcohol aboard aircraft, and the advertising of alcoholic beverages.

III

HUMAN RELATIONS AND ECONOMIC AFFAIRS DIVISION

Our General Conference has called us to give ourselves more fully to proclaiming that "Jesus Christ is Lord," and declared that to do this "we must seek a clearer understanding of the nature and mission of the Church, a deeper experience of discipleship and Christian fellowship." Especially in facing present tensions and challenges in human relations we must inquire what is the calling of the Church and how its life accords with that calling.

The Church is the body of Christ and exists to worship and serve Him. He is the head of the body and its life and witness must be in obedience to His will. It is His will that the Church be universal and inclusive. It is intended to be "a house of prayer for all people." The commission that He gave to the Church is to "go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." He prayed for those who were to believe in Him that "they all may be one." We have, therefore, no scriptural warrant to exclude from our fellowship those who He includes.

Recognizing this the General Conference of The Methodist Church has declared "there must be no place in The Methodist Church for racial discrimination or enforced segregation." Our bishops have urged that "it is our imperative duty to confess our failure to achieve God's will in Methodism and then resolutely to set about achieving a

Christian brotherhood in the church that will be free from racial discrimination and segregation." (1956 *Discipline*, Paragraph 2013).

In seeking to achieve such a brotherhood we should take account of the fact that there is in The Methodist Church no restriction on membership as to race or class. The *Discipline* directs that when "persons offer themselves for membership" and "shall have given proof of the genuineness of their faith in Christ and of their desire to assume the obligations and become faithful members of The Methodist Church" the pastor "shall . . . receive them into the fellowship of the church." The General Conference has recommended "that our pastors, upon whom rests the responsibility for receiving individuals into church membership, discharge that responsibility without regard to race, color or national origin." (1956 *Discipline*, Paragraph 2026).

The Church is called, not only to become itself a more real and inclusive Christian brotherhood, but to build bridges of understanding between various groups in our society. To this end we urge our pastors and people to support efforts to develop means of communication and reconciliation between the races in their communities. In particular, we recommend that our pastors participate in the formation and functioning of inter-racial ministerial associations, and that the women of our churches affiliate themselves with local chapters of United Church Women or share in the formation of such groups where they do not now exist.

We note with gratitude that Governor Terry Sanford has declared that our inter-racial problems can and must be met on the basis of understanding and good will, and pledge to him our support in achieving this. We would also express our appreciation and support to the Trustees of Duke University for their adopting the policy that admission to its professional and graduate schools is open to qualified persons without regard to race.

It should also be of concern to Methodists that our church, like other established denominations, has tended increasingly to draw its membership largely from the middle class. Especially in urban and industrial centers laboring people are to a disturbing extent outside the ministry of the church. If it is to be an inclusive fellowship, the Church must renew its concern for these, understand their needs, and defend their rights. In this connection we should remind ourselves of the article in our Social Creed which states, "we stand for the right of employers and employees alike to organize for collective bargaining, protection of both in the exercise of their rights, and the obligation of both to work for the public good. (1956 *Discipline*, Paragraph 2020). In our state, relations between labor and management have lately been marked by tension, misunderstanding, and violence. In this situation the Church should become a reconciling influence calling men to be governed by our fellowship in Christ instead of conflicting economic interests.

In our industrial and mechanical economy untrained and unskilled workers are rapidly being displaced, many of them with no place to go except on the welfare rolls. A church which is concerned with human beings should seek to help in discovering ways in which these people may both maintain their self-respect and contribute to the common life. In this connection we commend the North Carolina Council of Churches for its ministry to migrant agricultural workers, and call on our churches to support this work both financially and otherwise.

We affirm our historic stand that "the Methodist Church is committed to the public school as the most effective means of providing common education for all our children." (General Conference statement, 1960).

We deplore the pressures now being placed upon the United States Congress to channel federal funds towards the support of private or parochial schools. Our understanding of the doctrine of the separation of Church and State leads us to the conclusion that this is both unconstitutional and a dangerous departure from our full tax support of the public school system. The 1960 General Conference of the Methodist Church has stated that it is "unalterably opposed to the diversion of tax funds to the support of private and sectarian schools. In a short time this scattering process can destroy our American public school system and weaken the foundations of national unity."

We therefore urge the President and the Congress to lend their full support toward

safeguarding the doctrine of the separation of Church and State in consideration of pending federal aid to education bills.

Whereas Jesus Christ has broken down the dividing wall of hostility so that in him there is neither Jew nor Greek, bond nor free, male nor female, Negro nor white,

Be it therefore recommended that the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, seconding the action of the Western North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, recommend to the superintendent and the trustees of the Lake Junaluska Assembly that all the facilities of the Assembly be made available, at the nearest possible date, to all *bona fide* guests and delegates on the Assembly grounds.

Be it further recommended that notice of this recommendation be sent to Dr. James W. Fowler, Jr., superintendent of the Assembly and to appropriate members of the Board of Trustees of the Assembly.

REPORT OF STUDY COMMITTEE IN REFERENCE TO CORPORATIONS AUXILIARY TO AND/OR CONTROLLED BY THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE, SOUTHEASTERN JURISDICTION, OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

THAT, WHEREAS, the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church, duly assembled in Rocky Mount, North Carolina, on the 28th day of June, 1960, adopted a report "that there shall be no self-perpetuating Boards of Trustees (by means of nomination by such Boards of Trustees) of any corporation auxiliary to and/or controlled by the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church."

Now, THEREFORE, the undersigned Committee proposes the following resolution be adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED by the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church, duly assembled in Durham, North Carolina, that the Trustees, Directors or Members, who act as the governing bodies of any corporation auxiliary to and/or controlled by the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church shall be nominated as follows:

1. (a) Trustees of the Methodist College, Inc., North Carolina Wesleyan College, Inc., Louisburg College, Inc. shall be nominated to the Conference by the Board of Education of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

(b) Such Trustees of High Point College and Greensboro College as are elected by the North Carolina Annual Conference shall be nominated by the Board of Education of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

(c) That trustees representing the North Carolina Annual Conference on the Methodist Board of Publication, Inc., shall be nominated by the Cabinet of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

(d) The Trustees of the Methodist Retirement Home, Inc. and the Trustees of the Methodist Home for Children, Inc. shall be nominated by the Board of Hospitals and Homes.

(e) That the Trustees of the Board of Trustees and the Trustees of the Board of Education of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church, shall be nominated by the Cabinet of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

(f) That the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Foundation shall be nominated as set forth in the Charter of said Methodist Foundation.

(g) That the Trustees of the Board of Missions, Inc. shall be nominated as now provided.

That the word "trustees" as used in the above resolution shall mean the governing

bodies of such boards whether such governing bodies are called "Trustees," "Board of Directors," or "Members."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, whereas, said Report adopted by the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church, on the 28th day of June, 1960, provided that certain Charters of the above-named corporations be amended.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the corporations whose Charters need amending shall submit the proposed Amendments to said Charters to the Committee in Reference to Corporations Auxiliary to and/or controlled by the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church, on or before December 1, 1961 and shall amend the said Charters after the same have been approved by said Committee.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that said Committee shall report back to the next North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church, and shall report as to whether or not said boards have complied with the above resolutions.

That reference to Boards, Corporations or the North Carolina Annual Conference in the above resolutions shall mean such North Carolina Annual Conference, Boards or Corporations of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church.

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

The Council Annual Meeting was held at White Memorial Presbyterian Church, Raleigh, January 31-February 1, 1961, with the largest attendance in its history. Dr. Bernard Boyd, Canon Theodore Wedel, Dr. Benjamin Mays, Mrs. Murdoch McLeod, Dr. Ralph Sockman and Dr. Carlyle Marney brought addresses. The council dedicated a Station Wagon to be used in its ministry to migrants, approved two resolutions in the fields of human relations and world affairs, a new constitution, and a total budget for 1961 of \$63,890 including women's work. Rev. Vernon C. Tyson, Associate Minister of the Edenton Street Methodist Church in Raleigh was elected to the Executive Board. Dr. Cecil W. Robbins of Louisburg College retired after two terms as president of the council, to be succeeded by Dr. Harold J. Dudley of Raleigh. Mr. Blaine M. Madison, Commissioner of Correction, Raleigh and prominent Methodist layman was elected to be chairman of the new Council Committee on Public Relations which also makes him a member of the Executive Board.

Highlights of the council's past year include:

1. The ministry to 14,000 migrant workers in our state which employs 12 staff workers, maintains Day Care Centers for children at Elizabeth City and Hendersonville and uses two station wagons as mobile chapels.

2. Collection of 135,000 pounds of clothing—a 53% increase over 1959—for overseas relief; also contributions of \$6,000 for CROP, used to send food and medicine to the hungry and ill.

3. A Rural Church Convocation at State College, August 9-11th.

4. A Church Building and Architecture Conference at Charlotte, Nov. 11th.

5. A Radio-TV Workshop at the University of N. C., July 18-20.

6. Co-sponsorship of World Affairs Conferences at Chapel Hill in February and at Blue Ridge in July.

7. Sponsorship of World Day of Prayer, World Community Day, May Fellowship Day and other projects through the Council's Dept. of Church Women.

8. A program of Alcohol Education, including One-Day Institutes for ministers and church workers, college chapel talks, and demonstrations of alcohol's evils before high school assemblies.

9. A Youth Work program of work projects, retreats, and training conferences through UCYM and the Student Christian Council.

10. Served as a clearing house and co-ordinating agency for Weekday Bible Teaching programs reaching 33,000 boys and girls of elementary and high school age.

11. Sponsoring a Summer Ministry for Campers at Doughton Park in co-operation with the National Parks Ministry.

12. Planning for a great convocation in First Presbyterian Church, Greensboro, May 1-2, 1961 to celebrate the council's Silver Anniversary. Billy Graham, Liston Pope, Eugene Carson Blake, Frank P. Graham and others to make addresses.

REPORT OF THE DEACONESS BOARD

There are only two active deaconesses serving in the North Carolina Conference. They are: Miss Ethelynde Ballance, Director of Christian Education, Raeford Methodist Church, and Miss Mamiej Chandler, Director of the Methodist Student Center, Greenville.

There are within our conference three retired deaconesses: Miss Jennine Congleton of Greenville, Miss Elizabeth Davis of Rocky Mount, and Miss Mary Nichols of Wilmington.

The two active deaconesses serve in many ways not only in their appointed places but throughout the conference. Beyond her work at the Student Center, Miss Chandler serves on the Durham Regional Personnel Committee, in Methodist Student Movement Conferences and group meetings. In addition to her work at Raeford, Miss Ballance serves as Conference Secretary of Youth Work for the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and as an adult leader in youth work on the subdistrict, district, and conference levels. Both deaconesses answer many calls to speak, thus using many opportunities to interpret the deaconess relationship and to present the call to full-time Christian Service.

The members of the Deaconess Board feel the necessity for continuous interpretation of the deaconess relationship. Ministers and laymen, youth and adults, need to be informed that deaconesses serve through all agencies of the church from the local to the national level. They need to be informed concerning the opportunities and privileges open through the deaconess relationship.

Members of the Deaconess Board stand ready to share information whenever called upon.

Heretofore, we have not found a satisfactory time for the annual meeting of the board—a time when the members of the Cabinet could be present. With the interest and guidance of our Bishop, for which we are very appreciative, we look forward to the strengthening of our Conference Deaconess Board.

The Deaconess Board recommends:

That we continue emphasis on depth Bible study, or understanding our faith, on understanding our world.

That we seek to find meaning in our theme for the quadrennium, "Our Mission Today," with emphasis on (1) the faith which compels us, (2) the factors which confront us, (3) the frontiers that call us, and (4) the program that unites us in witness and service.

That there be an *active* Committee on Christian Vocations in each local church.

That the deaconess relationship be presented at "Vocations Conference" whenever held on either the district or conference level.

That the deaconess relationship be presented to all women employees of the church, and to business and professional women in the local church.

Section A

COMMITTEE ON GENERAL CHURCH SCHOOL WORK

O. KELLY INGRAM, *Chairman*

The purpose of Christian education does not differ from the purpose of the church itself. This purpose has been stated as follows: "Through Christian education the fellowship of believers (the church) seeks to help persons become aware of God's seeking love as shown especially in Jesus Christ and to respond in faith and love to the end that they may develop self-understanding, self-acceptance, and self-fulfillment under God; increasingly identify themselves as sons of God and members of the Christian community; live as Christian disciples in all relations in human society; and abide in Christian hope."—*Foundations of Christian Teaching in Methodist Churches*, page 31.

The Board of Education of the North Carolina Conference with its employed staff of workers consisting of an executive secretary, a director of children's work, a director of youth work and a director of adult work is strictly a service agency. It came into existence to help local churches provide effective Christian education for children, young people and adults and to assist all institutions of higher education related to the conference.

A major portion of the work of the Conference Board of Education is focused in the direction of the local church. In a very real sense its staff members serve on the staff of each and every local church in the conference. Indeed their very existence came about through a sense of urgency within the church schools of the conference.

The Conference Board of Education is organically related to the local church school which is in reality the church's school. "The school of the church is not a separate organizational entity. It is the heart of the church itself. It is the conditioning agency of the preached Word and the recruiting agency for the ongoing church, in membership, witness and service. Its purpose and process is to awaken and nurture loyal commitment to Jesus Christ."—Dr. Leon M. Adkins.

Report for 1960-1961

In a nation whose population continues to grow rapidly it is shocking to note that during the past year The Methodist Church had a decrease of one-half of one percent in church school membership and a church membership gain far below the population increase. We are pleased to note, however, that our conference had a modest gain of 1.6% in church membership and six-tenth of one percent gain in church school membership. While we are not concerned with numbers for the sake of report making, we are concerned about human souls represented by these statistics. We call upon our people to dedicate themselves to a greater effort to reach the masses with the teachings of the Master.

The church school continues to be the most effective evangelizing agency that we have. It is extremely significant that 75 percent of those who joined our churches on profession of faith the preceding year came from the church school.

Leadership training remains one of the principal emphases of our conference Board of Education. During the past year 32 accredited Christian Workers' Schools were held with an enrollment of 3,533 and 2,450 course cards of credit issued. In these schools fifteen observation laboratory courses were conducted with an enrollment of 209 student teachers. Twenty-four persons attended the Leadership and Laboratory Schools at Lake Junaluska. One two-day Coaching Conference for Prospective Leadership Education Instructors was held with an attendance of forty-three. We now have 494 persons to teach 91 courses. A Coaching Conference for Deans and Administrators of Christian Workers' Schools was held in September. A brochure called GUIDE to assist

local churches in setting up a program of leadership training has been under study and should be ready for limited use this year while undergoing further study and revision.

Five Area Consultation Workshops on Church School Building and Equipment were held in March with Dr. Glenn S. Gothard of Nashville, Tennessee, as the resource leader. Numerous consultation sessions of a similar nature have been conducted in local churches by our Conference Board of Education staff.

Local church consultations have also been conducted in the area of Goals and Materials, Lesson Planning, Grading and Room Arrangement, Leadership Training, Planning the Program of Christian Education, Home and Church Co-operation, Evaluation of the Local Church Program of Christian Education, etc., both by Conference and District staff personnel and resource leaders trained in specific areas of responsibility.

Our second Orientation Workshop for New Pastors was held at Camp Don-Lee in August. This two-day workshop, sponsored by the various conference boards and agencies, was attended by approximately twenty-five pastors who were beginning their first year of service in the North Carolina Conference.

District Pastors' Consultation Seminars on Christian Education in the Local Church were held with excellent attendance. The purpose of these seminars was to evaluate the program of Christian education in our local churches, to discover areas of "felt" need, and to recommend ways by which the Conference Board of Education can help meet these needs. Future conference programs and local church consultations will be based on these findings.

We wish to commend the churches and church schools of our conference for their increased interest in the observance of Church School Rally Day, Race Relations Sunday and Methodist Student Day. Incomplete reports indicate good offerings for these important causes.

We express appreciation to our conference staff, our district directors, instructors in Christian Workers' Schools and other volunteer workers for their faithful and effective work during the past year. Our district superintendents, pastors and local church leaders have been most helpful in the program of Christian education and to these we offer our sincere thanks.

Emphasis for 1961-1962

Outpost Church Schools

The Quadrennial Emphasis for 1960-1964 adopted by the 1960 General Conference contains this challenge: "Let us serve Him in evangelistic outreach through new church schools. There are millions of children and adults learning about their world's science and geography but not about their world's Savior. Many of them are our neighbors. We call upon each district in Methodism to search for places where through establishing new church schools, perhaps in homes, many persons may become Disciples of Jesus Christ, our Lord."

We recommend that this emphasis be implemented through the "United Witness for Christ and His Church," a co-operative, inter-board program sponsored by the Conference Boards of Evangelism, Education, Missions, Lay Activities and Town and Country Work. This program calls for a conference-wide religious census in October, visitation in every local church in November, district meetings on outpost church schools, and survey of outpost opportunities in January, selection and training of outpost leaders in February, and starting outpost schools and classes in March.

This is a thrilling program designed to discover unreached persons in every community and to win them for Christ, church and church school membership. It merits the prayers and dedicated support of all of us.

Leadership Training

1. Christian Workers' Schools

- a. The goal is at least one school for each subdistrict.
- b. The Conference Board of Education will continue to pay one-half of the instructor honoraria of all accredited schools.
- c. A core curriculum for schools is being developed by the Conference Board of Education. The core will include laboratory observation courses in all divisions.

d. A Coaching Conference for Deans and Administrators is planned for October, 1962, and a Refresher Conference for Certified Instructors for January or February, 1963.

2. One-Teacher Schools for Small Churches

a. As a special service to the small church or charge, the Conference Board of Education will provide a special worker for a period of three days to help train its workers for a more effective program of Christian education. The staff of the Board of Education is to determine what churches are available for this service.

b. Four courses are offered:

- (1) "Christian Education in the Small Church"
- (2) "How to Improve the Church School" (610)
- (3) "How to Teach in the Church School" (141)
- (4) "Goals and Materials for Methodist Church Schools"

3. GUIDE

a. To assist local churches in setting up a systematic and continuing program of leadership training, the Conference Board of Education staff is developing a brochure to be called GUIDE.

b. GUIDE provides for the certification of church school teachers who complete the "Basic Courses of Study" and agree to uphold the "Standards for Teachers in Methodist Church Schools."

c. Churches that adopt GUIDE will set a target date after which it will require all teachers who work under the jurisdiction of the Commission on Education to qualify for certification.

d. The local church will adopt a program of leadership training designed to qualify its teachers for certification under this program.

4. Additional Training Opportunities

a. Conference level:

- (1) Interboard Orientation Workshop for New Pastors, Camp Don-Lee, August 21-23, 1961
- (2) District Directors' Training Conference, Camp Don-Lee, August 23-26, 1961
- (3) District Junior High Curriculum Workshops, September 11-21, 1961
- (4) Missionary Education Workshops, October 9-19, 1961
- (5) Orientation of Outpost Church School Leaders, February 26-March 8, 1962
- (6) Vacation Church School Institutes and Church Library Seminars, March 26-30; April 2-7; April 9-13, 1962

5. The Conference Board of Education is to develop a program of minimum standards and certification for Methodist Church Schools.

Improving Church School Buildings and Equipment

1. A prepared file, properly marked in manila folder, is to be distributed to all pastors and churches by the Board of Education. This file will contain the brochure, "Steps in Planning a Church School Building," and other pertinent information and help.

2. It is recommended that the District Director of General Church School Work be made a member of the District Board on Buildings and Location. District Directors are to receive proper training to qualify them for admittance on the District Board.

3. It is also recommended that the Conference Board of Missions and the District Boards of Buildings and Locations strongly advise any church planning to construct or equip educational facilities consult the staff of the Conference Board of Education prior to development plans.

1. World Service Sunday in the Church School, each fourth Sunday.

2. Church School Rally Day, September 17, 1961. It is recommended that a letter, brochure and offering envelope be sent to every family.

3. Promotion Sunday in the Church School, September 24, 1961.

5. Christmas Offering for the Gilbert-Lambuth Memorial Chapel at Paine College, December 17 or 24, 1961.

9. Children's Day, May 6, 1962.
10. National Family Week, May 6-13, 1962.

Consultation Services Available to Local Churches

1. The Conference Board of Education is preparing a brochure describing the areas of consultation available to local churches by the Board staff.
2. The District Director of General Church School Work will prepare a brochure on consultation services available within the district and the names and addresses of resource persons available for such consultation.

For his outstanding leadership and progressiveness in the field of Christian Education, we commend Dr. C. P. Morris, and recommended his reappointment as Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Education.

Section B

COMMITTEE ON CHILDREN'S WORK

E. C. SHOAF, *Chairman*

Progress Report for 1960-1961

"What, then, is child nurture? It is a sacred, priestly method whereby souls are brought up from infancy so as not to think otherwise than that they belong to Christ and so that blessedness for them shall consist in knowing and serving him, and their greatest misfortune in becoming separated from him in any way whatsoever." (Quoted in C. A. Bowen, *Child and Church*).

This has been the aim and purpose of the Committee on Children's Work and the Conference Director of Children's Work as they have planned and labored together. To this end efforts have been directed to aid the local church in its ministry to children.

A brief resume' shows the effort in this direction.

During the year 10 laboratory courses were conducted with 111 persons enrolled and 87 receiving course cards of recognition. One of these courses was a weekend laboratory course held in a local church.

There were 29 courses on children's work taught in Christian Workers' Schools. Five hundred and fifty-four persons enrolled and 406 received course cards of recognition.

To aid teachers in the local church teach the missionary units in the January additional sessions, 14 workshops were held. There were 280 persons enrolled. These workshops were conducted in co-operation with the secretaries of Children's Work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

To offer guidance in specific areas four workshops were conducted during the winter quarter. Two of these dealt with the use of music with children, one was a workshop on creative activities and one was a study of the basic manuals. A total of 202 persons attended these workshops.

During April, 1961, 14 Vacation Church School Institutes were held to guide the local church teachers in preparing to teach in the Vacation Church Schools. Fourteen hundred persons were reached in the institutes. All of the instructors were persons from the North Carolina Annual Conference.

Twelve persons in the children's field were enrolled in courses in the Coaching Conference held in February 1961. Each person prepared to teach one of the following

courses: Understanding Children, Working with Primary Children, Working with Junior Boys and Girls.

During the summer of 1960 there were eleven Junior Camps conducted. Four hundred and six children attended these camps.

A new program of guidance for the teachers of Methodist Weekday Nursery and Kindergarten Classes was instituted with an all day meeting on Saturday, March 25, 1961. Miss Vera Zimmerman, preschool specialist from the General Board of Education, Nashville, Tennessee, was the leader. Twenty teachers attended this meeting.

Recommendations for 1961-62

1. *Vacation Church Schools*

a. That the local Vacation Church Schools more thoroughly evaluate their schools and that more careful use be made of the report blanks.

b. That the period of March 25-April 13 be reserved for Area Vacation Church School Institutes and that there be 15 such institutes. One of the institutes is to be planned for a Saturday date.

c. The texts will be: Kindergarten, *Stories of Jesus*, Primary, *Outdoors in Palestine*, Junior, *People Who Lived in Jesus Day*.

2. *Missionary Education*

a. That the Conference Board of Education join with the Conference Board of Missions and the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service in conducting Missionary Education Workshops for all age groups and that the period October 9-19 be reserved for these workshops.

b. The texts will be: World Missions; Primary, *Three Children of Chili*; Junior, *South American All*; National Missions; Primary, *Timmy's Team*; Junior, *The Thunder Egg*.

3. *Leadership Training Program*

a. That District Directors promote Children's courses in Christian Workers' Schools held in their district.

b. That books other than the text be ordered from a suggested list for help to teachers.

c. That local churches and subdistrict schools be encouraged to make use of Laboratory courses in teacher training.

d. That a list of volunteer resource persons in each age group of each district be made available to local pastors, local church school superintendents, and district directors.

e. That District Conferences on Improving Teaching be held during the fall or winter quarter.

f. That District Directors be alert to the need for Music Workshops for children's workers.

4. *Weekday Nursery and Kindergarten*

a. That workshops be provided for teachers in Methodist Weekday Nursery and Kindergarten classes.

b. That these workshops be oriented in the Methodist organization and philosophy of education but that teachers from other schools be invited to attend.

5. *Ministry to Children with Handicaps and to Exceptional Children*

a. That Miss Charity Holland, the Rev. A. C. Lee, Dr. Robert B. Hughes, the Rev. E. C. Shoaf, and W. G. Brogan comprise a committee to work toward establishing a Sunday program in this area.

6. *Day Camping*

a. That District Directors promote day camping in their districts at one of their regularly scheduled district meetings.

b. That Day Camp Laboratory be offered to the local church camp leaders.

7. That an emphasis on special days be continued by Children's Workers.
8. That special attention be given in all local churches to the work of the Nursery Home Visitor.
9. That all Children's Workers recognize and participate in the Quadrennial Emphasis, *Jesus Christ is Lord*.

Section C

COMMITTEE ON YOUTH WORK

W. ALBERT GRAHAM, *Chairman*

Progress Report for 1960-1961

Enrollment in the Youth Division increased 1,216 to a total of 27,748, for an increase of 4.5%.

The Senior Youth Assemblies at Louisburg College were attended by 298 delegates and staff and the Senior Workshop was attended by 166.

Four hundred and fifty-two delegates and staff attended the Ninth Annual Conference Session at Duke University in August. These persons were joined by 1,500 youth and their adult leaders for Rally Day.

Four hundred and sixty-seven Junior Highs participated in the summer camping program. The first Senior Camp was attended by 55 youth.

In the area of leadership education there was an increase in the number of courses held for youth and adult workers with youth. Thirty-two courses were offered in Christian Workers Schools with 666 persons enrolled and 475 receiving credit cards. This report includes four Junior High Labs and one Senior Lab.

Efforts were made this year to begin Fellowship of the Adult Workers with Youth on the subdistrict level. A few began these meetings and made plans for additional ones.

Vacation Church School Institutes were conducted for workers with Junior Highs with 127 persons enrolled.

Ten persons attended the Coaching Conference in February in order to prepare for certification in youth courses. Five enrolled in the "Guiding Seniors" course and five in the "Guiding Older Youth" course. Three persons will receive certification as Junior High Laboratory Instructors this summer at Lake Junaluska.

Several districts held Junior High Rallies with excellent results. These new ventures will be followed by other beyond-the-local church events for Junior Highs.

This coming summer opportunities will be provided for the Older Youth of our Conference. A weekend Older Youth Assembly will be held at Camp Don-Lee in July. The camping program is being expanded to include this age group. An Older Youth Trail hike will take place along a portion of the Appalachian Trail in the Smoky Mountains.

For the year 1959-1960, the Conference Methodist Youth Fund goal of \$15,000 was exceeded with a sum of \$16,219.13.

The Youth Department co-operated with the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations in the planning, publicizing, and directing of the Church Vocations Conference held at Edenton Street Church in April. One hundred and twenty-eight youth attended this Conference.

A word of appreciation goes to the District Directors of Youth Work for their excellent leadership and dedication during this past year. The church's mission to the youth of today was strengthened as a result of their labors.

Recommendations for Youth Work

1. That a special Study Commission be appointed to study and evaluate the Methodist Youth Fellowship on all levels and to make recommendations for future programming. That the Executive Secretary, the Chairman of the Committee on Youth, and the Conference Director of Youth Work appoint this Study Commission, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee of the Board of Education.

2. That the new Junior High Curriculum materials be introduced in special two hour institutes in each district and in laboratory schools strategically placed throughout the Conference.

3. That the Conference and District Directors of Youth Work be available for consultations with local church and subdistrict workers with youth for leadership training. A special training session for District Directors be held to help them in this work.

4. That laboratory classes be included in Christian Workers' Schools.

5. That courses for adult workers with youth be included in all Christian Workers' Schools.

6. That the Conference Director of Youth Work begin exploring the possibility of a "Convocation for Adult Workers with Youth" which is to be held as soon as possible.

7. That the use of the following new materials be promoted throughout the Conference: *Handbook, Manual for Junior High Workers, Guidebook, and The Methodist Youth Fellowship Beyond the Local Church, Manual for Senior High Workers.*

8. That the Conference Youth Council consider the possibilities of Senior Work Camps as a part of their regular program.

9. That renewed emphasis be placed upon making more personal the act of giving to the Methodist Youth Fund.

10. That attention be called to high school Seniors that when they enter college they can continue their missionary giving through the Methodist Student Fellowship Fund.

11. That the local church Secretary of Student Work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service be urged to send the "blue cards" to the college campus.

12. That a youth mission study be held in each local church using the study materials: "Churches for New Times" or "The Christian Mission in Latin American Countries."

13. That a district planning retreat be held soon after ASC to evaluate and plan the district and subdistrict program for the year.

14. That emphasis be placed on Spiritual Life Retreats and weekend Youth Revivals as a means of deepening the spiritual life of the youth in the local church.

We commend Rev. J. Conrad Glass, Jr. for his first year of service on the board staff and heartily recommend his reappointment as Conference Director of Youth Work.

Section D

COMMITTEE ON ADULT WORK

Progress Report, 1960-61

For the first time, a complete staff of District and Subdistrict Directors of Adult Work was secured. After training and planning in District Adult Council meetings, these leaders conducted a total of 30 Curriculum Selection Training Sessions for Pastors. This major emphasis must be continued.

Enrollment in the Adult Division decreased by 239, because of a drop of 542 in Home Members. Otherwise we gained 303, for a total of 62,617. A great need for increased visiting, and improved teaching, is indicated.

A most successful new program was the Young Adult Spiritual Life Retreat at Camp Chestnut Ridge, attracting 47 to camp out in October. For the third year, the Young Adult Conference Council sponsored work camps to help prepare Camp Chestnut Ridge and Camp Kerr for use.

Six persons participated in the Coaching Conference, to work on certification in the course—"The Use of the Bible in Teaching Adults." Two have received certification, and one has taught the course.

Another first was the Adult Laboratory course in the Alamance Christian Workers' School. A total of 17 adult work courses have been offered this year, with enrollment of 272, and 187 Course Cards of Recognition. This number should be doubled.

Bible Conferences were held in Roxboro and Beaufort.

The Young Adult Newsletter was expanded in circulation and scope, to include all adult work as The Adult Articulator, bringing interpretations, promotion, new materials and ideas to pastors, adult division superintendents, and young adult presidents.

The Conference Director has engaged in some type field service on 180 days of the

Conference year, 28 in local churches, 44 in subdistrict functions, 18 at district level, 82 in Conference program, and 9 in other activities such as the White House Conference on Aging and planning for the Adult Lab at Lake Junaluska.

Quadrennial Goals—1960-64

1. Create a consciousness of the unique importance of Christian adults in the life of the community and of their need for continuing spiritual, mental and social growth.
2. Increase awareness of the significance of the Adult Division in the church organization, and stimulate the formation of Adult Councils in local churches, to increase service to adults of all ages; and to inform members of work of our Methodist agencies and institutions.
3. Help to increase understanding and mutual appreciation between members of various economic, social, and racial groups both inside and outside the church.
4. Foster an increased knowledge of the Bible, and acceptance of the Christian's obligation and desire to relate it to daily living.
5. Help local adult classes to become Redemptive Fellowships, increase active participation of nominal church members, and help the church school become a more effective evangelistic arm of the church.
6. Improve teaching procedures so as to involve class members in learning situations and help each person to understand and assume leadership and membership functions.
7. Help adults understand themselves, to strengthen marital relationships, and improve family life through increased parental competence.

Program and Recommendations for 1961-62

A. Leadership Training—the Major Goal for 1961-62

1. We urge the inclusion of a course on Adult Work, or Adult Laboratory, in every Christian Workers' School. Special emphasis should be given to 411—"Helping Adults Learn," and 416—"The Use of the Bible in Teaching Adults," with follow-up through the "Guided Reading" program.
2. Each District Director will conduct Clinics for Teachers of Adult Classes, after special training.
3. It is recommended that Missionary Education Workshops for teachers of adult church-wide mission studies be conducted by selected leaders.
4. District Directors, the Conference Director, and selected resource persons, will be available for local church consultation on materials and teaching procedures, by invitation.
5. We recommend the development where possible in local churches or communities, of college level, extension-type courses in religion, for lay persons, taught by college teachers, on a once-a-week, registration fee basis.

B. Conference Meetings

1. We recommend that one Young Adult representative to the Young Adult Assembly be elected from each church, confirmed at the 4th Quarterly Conference and sent by the church, with the Assembly open to additional delegates.
2. We urge that all District and Subdistrict Directors of Adult Work be helped by their churches to attend the Young Adult Assembly each year.
3. We propose a Conference on Preparation for Aging to be included in the Conference on Christian Education in 1962.
4. We propose a Conference on Family Life in the Middle Years to be included in the Conference on Christian Education in 1963.
5. We propose an Adult Laboratory to be included in the Conference on Christian Education in 1964.
6. We recommend co-operation in a Recreation Laboratory, in the Spring of 1962.

C. District and Subdistrict Work

1. Training of District and Subdistrict Directors.
 - a. One-day District Adult Council Meetings—Fall 1961.

b. Half-day District Adult Council Meetings—Spring 1962.

c. District Directors' Workshop, August 23-25, Camp Don-Lee

2. Programs—to be selected by each Subdistrict or District.

a. Subdistrict Directors to visit all local young adult groups, after training in District Adult Council meetings.

b. Adult Education Workshops to introduce new Manual.

c. Bible Conferences—in co-operation with General Board of Education.

d. Mental Health Workshops—in co-operation with State Board of Health.

e. Social Action Seminars—in co-operation with Board of Social Concerns.

f. Older Adult Workshops—in co-operation with Retirement Home and delegates to White House Conference on Aging.

g. TV Education Courses—in co-operation with WUNC-TV.

h. College Extension Courses—in co-operation with colleges and universities.

i. Christian Workers School Course.

3. Our goal is at least one program in addition to the Christian Workers School course, carried out in every subdistrict of the Conference in 1961-62.

D. *Adult Education in the Local Church*

1. We emphasize the importance of the Adult Council for planning and coordinating work to reach all adults with Christian teaching; and offer literature and consultation to help implement its work.

2. We continue to urge all adult classes to examine all available curriculum materials, to select courses based on interests of all class members, and to select teachers for units of study rather than for a year. A sample Unit Selector and instructions for its use will appear in a summer issue of *Adult Teacher* magazine, and in "Resources for Adult Groups" for 1961-62.

3. We call upon every church to observe Young Adult Week, January 21-28, 1962. Suggestions will be supplied.

4. We recommend the use of teams of teachers, for improved continuity and increasing participation in adult classes, and of planning for seating arrangements which enable class members to see and talk to each other easily.

5. We urge every class to carry on activities in all the seven Areas of Concern, based on the new manual, *Adult Education in The Methodist Church*. The areas are study, worship, evangelism, missions, social action, family education, and recreation. This program should include visits to agencies and institutions of our Conference.

6. Local church groups are invited to call upon Conference, District and Subdistrict Directors of Adult Work for help. A list of all directors will be furnished with a fall issue of the "Adult Articulator."

Section E

COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN FAMILY LIFE

H. L. HARRELL, *Chairman**Report for 1960-61*

Courses in Family Life or Preparation for Marriage were included in only five Christian Workers' Schools, pointing up a need for greatly increased emphasis. An outgrowth of one of these courses was a series of lectures by the Guidance Counselor in Moore County Schools. Family Life Institutes were planned around Hertford, Fremont, Durham, Wilson and Aberdeen. Many local church and community studies have occurred, in Sunday school classes, family nights, co-operation with PTA's, etc. Two district and two conference family camps have been planned. The 1960 Family Camps at Don-Lee attracted 142 persons. Subdistrict MYF's and YAF's have used aspects of family life as subjects for programming.

Needs Listed:

1. Single adults—finding a mate or adjusting to singleness.
2. Minister's family life—education and help with problems.
3. Unwed parents and forced marriages—a radically different approach is needed in church and school programs of education for marriage.
4. Meaningful Family Worship.
5. Total Family Education Program in Local Church, including marriage preparation.

Recommendations:

1. Conduct two, 2-day Seminars for Ministers on: "The Minister and His Family."
2. Develop a plan for a total program of Family Education in the local church.
3. Set as a major goal for the year in family life—"On some night every week, every member of every family stay home together."
4. We remind every minister of the *Pastor's Manual for Premarital Counseling*, and the book for engaged couples, *In Holy Matrimony*, and urge their use.
5. We recommend the inclusion of a period on marriage counseling in the Orientation Workshop for New Pastors.
6. Co-operate with other churches, schools and community groups in providing marriage preparation education. Explore new approaches and materials, including school curriculum.
7. Help families to plan for worship by suggesting or providing materials, demonstrating worship at church family nights, visiting in homes to provide leadership, etc.
8. Let every church make a determined effort to concentrate meetings on one night a week, to cut down the part the church plays in dividing families.
9. Each church school have a representative Family Life Committee, with the chairman elected by the Quarterly Conference.
10. Let every church observe National Family Week, either within its own fellowship or in co-operation with other churches. We especially recommend the Round Robin Institute, as follows:

Five churches plan together for the five-night institute, choosing a general theme and five topics. Each church accepts responsibility for preparing a program on one topic; each church uses a different method of presentation, such as address, film, drama, panel-forum, discussion groups. The programs move from church to church, while members of each congregation attend their own church each night.

11. We urge every church to encourage family camping among its members, and call attention to the following scheduled opportunities:

July 17-21—Camp Don-Lee.

August 18-20—Camp Chestnut Ridge.

June 11-August 18—Camp Kerr Lake.

This camp is open by reservation, to local church groups of all kinds, and individual families.

Christian Education Section

Progress Report

The three-day seminar for Directors and Ministers of Christian Education, Educational Assistants, and their ministers, co-sponsored with the Western North Carolina Conference directors, was held on November 1-4, 1960 at Duke Memorial Methodist Church, Durham, N. C., on the theme, "Foundations of Christian Education" with Dr. McMurry Richey as keynote speaker. Dr. Wayne Lindecker of Nashville, Tennessee, also was a resource leader. At this meeting Miss Bernice Ballance was elected as President of the North Carolina Conference Directors Association. The next state-wide meeting of directors is being planned for 1962 at High Point, N. C.

Co-sponsorship with the Western North Carolina Conference Directors' Association and the two Conference Board of Education of the Camp Leaders Training Camp held at Chestnut Ridge Camp, May 1-5, 1961.

Co-operation with the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations in directing the Christian Vocations Conference, April 21-23 at Edenton Street Methodist Church, Raleigh, N. C., through representative of the directors association serving on the commission.

Two fellowship meetings: (1) The Annual Luncheon meeting given by the Board of Education during the 1960 session of Annual Conference, and (2) a cook-out on March 12, 1961.

The Director's Association expresses its appreciation to the Board of Education for the Board's support in all of its activities as well as the encouragement it gave through the pastors and churches in sending directors to the planned meetings at the conference, jurisdictional and national levels.

The committee makes the following recommendations with relation to directors and ministers of Christian education:

1. That the Board of Education encourage pastors and local churches to send their director or minister of education or educational assistant to the National Methodist Conference on Christian Education to be held in Chicago, November, 1961.

2. That the Board of Education disseminate information concerning the John Q. Schisler Scholarships for graduate study in Christian education and encourage the use of such scholarships for the training of more directors and ministers of education for our conference.

Music Section

A two-day conference-wide music workshop, sponsored by the Board of Education, was held at Duke Memorial Methodist Church, Durham, on February 6-7, 1961. Despite inclement weather 88 attended the most inspiring and worthwhile sessions. Dr. J. Edward Moyer, Professor of Church Music at Wesley Theological Seminary, Washington, D. C., and Vice-President of the National Fellowship of Methodist Musicians, and Mr. Walter H. Ball, Jr., choirmaster at Myers Park Methodist Church, Charlotte, N. C., served as resource leaders for the workshop. Other interest group leaders were from our conference: Mrs. C. S. Sullivan, Duke Memorial Methodist Church; Mrs. J. H. Waldrop, Jr., of Fremont; Rev. Bruce Pate of St. Mark's Methodist Church, Kinston; and Rev. Wesley Brogan, Conference Director of Children's Work. Dr. John J. Rudin II, associate professor of speech and worship at Duke Divinity School and chairman of the Commission on Worship for the North Carolina Conference, explained the Revised Communion Service and served as celebrant for Holy Communion Monday. An extensive and excellent Church Music display from Cokesbury was available.

District Music Workshops have been held in the New Bern, Goldsboro and Raleigh Districts and are planned for the Wilmington and Fayetteville districts. A growing need

and desire for such area workshops is prevalent, as well as a listing of resource persons available to help small churches with their music programs. Music courses have been included in several subdistrict Christian Workers' Schools. Music workshops for church school children's workers have been held in the Goldsboro and Rocky Mount districts. A committee is now at work on plans for the 1961-62 conference workshop.

Attention is called to the wording of paragraph 247.2 in the 1960 *Discipline*, which states: "Provided he is certified as described in par. 1451 his title shall be minister of music if he is an ordained ministerial member of an Annual Conference, or director of music if he is a layman."

In the area of Directors of Music, the committee makes the following recommendations:

1. That every local church have a functioning music committee, using the brochure, "The Music Committee in the Local Church," 9058-B-Rev., as its guide.

2. That every local church place an adequate amount of money in its budget for an effective ministry of music, subscribing to the Methodist monthly magazine, "Music Ministry," for its leaders.

3. That all local church musicians and interested ministers join the National Fellowship of Methodist Musicians (NAFOMM). Information may be secured from Mrs. Robert D. Massey, Zebulon, N. C., conference representative.

4. That local churches encourage and give financial assistance to church musicians attending the annual Institute of Church Music at Lake Junaluska and other training opportunities.

5. That district music representatives plan at least one district workshop during the year, and that they make resource persons available to local churches and subdistricts whenever possible.

6. That the Board of Education sponsor a conference-wide music workshop during the coming year.

7. That Dr. J. Edward Moyer be invited to attend the 1962 Annual Conference as leader for conference hymn singing.

8. That every eligible Methodist musician seek certification as a Methodist Director of Music. Information and application forms may be secured from the Board of Education, Box 6667, College Station, Durham, N. C.

COMMITTEE ON CAMPS AND CONFERENCES

BROOKS PATTEN, *Chairman*

Progress Report

Through a quarter of a century of experimentation and study, camping has become a vital part of our Christian Education program. New types of programs have been developing. Although originally projected as a summer program for early teen-age boys and girls, camping has now expanded to a program for virtually every age group. Day camping as well as resident camping by a local church, week-end and over-night camping for youth and adults, family camping, work camps, trip camping, trail camping retreats, are now a very real part of the camping program of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

Last summer a few major steps were taken in order to afford a program of enrichment, flexibility, and expansion. For the first time it was possible for boys and girls Junior and Junior High ages to register for the camp and period of their choice. Junior and Junior High resident camps were offered concurrently at Don-Lee, Chestnut Ridge and Kerr Lake. For the first time counselors were paid for their services. This helped in recruitment, training, and a quality program. Last summer the resident camping program included eleven Junior camps with attendance of 436, eleven Junior High camps with attendance of 467, one Senior camp with attendance of 55 and two family camps with attendance of 142.

New Features—Don-Lee: Sailboating was introduced last summer. Thanks to many good laymen of the New Bern and Elizabeth City Districts, four new prams were secured. For this summer eight additional prams will be ready for use. A new out-post camp was constructed with an additional out-post ready for this summer. These out-posts include well, pumps and cabinets. The family camps proved most successful, with an additional family camp scheduled for this summer at Chestnut Ridge.

Chestnut Ridge—The new swimming pool is the most exciting new addition to the facilities at the Ridge. This is a fine pool donated by the laymen of the Burlington and Durham districts, at a cost \$8,500. It was first used during the last week of camp last summer. Junior Camping enrollment at Chestnut Ridge and Kerr Lake showed a slight increase last summer over the previous year, with 436 as compared to 407.

The facilities at Chestnut Ridge are in constant year round demand by our own churches and other groups. A most successful Fall Retreat for the Methodist Student

Movement was held there. A camp Leaders Camp for the Western North Carolina and the North Carolina Conferences was held in May 1961. Local churches are making continuous use of the facilities for Retreat Week-end groups.

Kerr Lake—Last summer two weeks of resident camping for Junior and Junior Highs were conducted for the first time. Four small group camps are now fully equipped. These and the picnic-cook-out area are being reserved exclusively this summer for individual family and local church and district use. A director-lifeguard will be at the camp for ten weeks to supervise and co-ordinate the use of these facilities. Swimming, boating, hiking, camping, fishing—all of these are available for the families and local church groups throughout the summer by advance reservation. We urge the conference to make maximum use of this excellent opportunity.

Camp Rockfish—Located on Lake Upchurch and Rockfish Creek, thirteen miles southeast of Raeford, this valuable site of 400 acres awaits basic development. Master-planning is well nigh complete. Initial steps of construction here are the next big phase of our program. It is anticipated that a large amount of capital funds will be required for this work. First steps include access roads, well and water system, cook-out and family camping area, beach development, resident camp area. With funds contributed through the Fayetteville District Christmas offering and from our construction budget, it is anticipated that a start on this program will be made in 1962.

General—Senior camping is offered for this summer at Camp Don-Lee as a resident program. A new feature is an Appalachian Trail Hike, limited to twelve older, experienced campers, conducted by the Director of Youth Work. Family trailer and trip camping are enticing many of our Methodist families. The Camp Committee has secured information on equipment and manufacturers which will be gladly made available on request.

Our Camp Committee is co-operating fully with the newly-established Camping Commission of the General Board of Education and will be represented at the National Conference which meets in November 1961.

It is recommended that local churches assist in the sending of boys and girls to camp at least to the extent of five dollars per camper, which is the amount of increase found to be necessary in camper fees. This increase was begun last summer and remains effective this year. The committee also recommends that Mr. Robert E. Reed be elected to continue to serve as Superintendent of Camps. We wish to recognize his invaluable assistance to the carrying out of our expanding program.

Appreciation is again extended to the many people of our conference who have labored and shared to make this program possible. Our special thanks to the dedicated parents, pastors, teachers and counselors who give of their time to help young people to grow toward God amid the wonders of his out-of-doors. With a limited budget which allows only \$15,000 annually for capital improvements and expansion, it is clearly evident that we must join hands beyond our fixed income to help provide funds for the work that needs doing. The support of the Christmas Offering this year is gratefully acknowledged. This amount of approximately \$8,000 has made possible many of the new features of our camping program.

COMMITTEE ON HIGHER EDUCATION

Section A

Report on the Institutions

The dreams of the church for a trained clergy and lay leadership find fulfillment in the one hundred twenty-three institutions related to The Methodist Church. The North Carolina Conference has a link with all of these schools, colleges and universities. It is specifically involved in the administration and support of six institutions of higher learning in North Carolina, namely: Duke University and Duke Divinity School at Durham,

Greensboro College at Greensboro, High Point College at High Point, Louisburg College at Louisburg, Methodist College at Fayetteville and North Carolina Wesleyan College at Rocky Mount.

Each of these institutions is making a significant contribution to the North Carolina Conference. We are profoundly grateful for the service they are rendering and pledge to them our continued concern and support.

Section B

Paine College

We call special attention to the strategic importance of the Race Relations Day Offering. The very survival of our historic Negro Methodist Colleges depends upon a substantial increase in this offering. We call upon our pastors and local church leaders to vigorously promote this offering on February 11, 1962. We recommend that this offering be designed for the support of Paine College.

We also call attention to the action taken by the 1960 Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference to raise a minimal offering of \$250,000 in the Jurisdiction to erect a Gilbert-Lambuth Memorial Chapel at Paine College, Augusta, Georgia, during the fiftieth anniversary year of the arrival of Bishop Walter Russel Lambuth and Dr. John Wesley Gilbert in the heart of the Congo. The quota for the North Carolina Conference is \$16,101.00. We concur in the recommendation of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance that this amount be raised in Special Christmas Offerings in 1961 and 1962 and we call upon our pastors and local church leaders to vigorously promote this offering on December 24, 1961.

Section C

College Sustaining Fund 1961-1962

The Board of Education requested that the regular increase of \$40,000.00 in this fund be included in the World Service and Conference Benevolences recommendation to the conference. We regret that this amount has not been included in the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance. The amount recommended is continued at \$330,000.00. This is \$170,000 short of the half million dollar goal which the Conference has set for itself.

Interpretation has been made that the provision of Par. 1450 of the *Discipline*, which states, "The Board (of Education) shall determine the distribution of the funds thus received to each of the general interests under the care of the board," no longer applies in the case of sustaining funds.

914 of the 1960 *Discipline*, of the responsibilities of the Annual Conference Board of Education as related to the Annual Conference Commission on Higher Education, with specific reference as to which group, the Board of Education or the Commission on Higher Education, is responsible (under Paragraphs 1450 and 1452) for allocating sustaining funds for educational institutions.”

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION

The Commission on Christian Higher Education takes cognizance of the importance of Education that is Christian and is trying to keep this high level of Education and training constantly before both the parents and the young people of our Church. When we realize that more than 8,000 Methodist boys and girls are attending State Institutions of higher learning, we wonder if we are doing our duty in helping to direct these young people to our Methodist Colleges. The scholastic standing of our colleges is very high and compares favorably with any State Institution. We should never cease to emphasize that education which is Christian specializes in something more than the mental and physical. It is said of the youthful years of the Master that, "He increased in wisdom, in stature, and in favor with both God and man," meaning of course, that his training was mental, physical, social, and spiritual. Neither should we forget that mental and physical training is not enough, we must add to that social and spiritual values emphasized and nurtured in our Methodist colleges.

COLLEGE SUSTAINING FUND

Since the establishment of the Sustaining Fund for our colleges ten years ago, the fund has grown from the first year allocation of \$35,000.00 to \$330,000.00 the present year just closed. This has become the life-line of our colleges and we recommend that we continue to increase this annual allotment to our colleges by \$40,000.00 until we have reached our original set-goal of \$50,000.00 annually. With the establishment of two new colleges in our Conference, and with the increasing financial responsibilities which we must carry as a conference obligation, we must allocate more funds to the colleges in our conference. Therefore, we recommend that the College Sustaining Fund be adjusted so that it will reflect a redistribution of the United College Appeal Fund, which was a joint project with the Western North Carolina Conference, and on which the Western North Carolina Conference stopped payments thereon three years ago. Also, we recommend a further readjustment of the College Sustaining Fund as reflected in the table below beginning with 1961-1962 Conference.

We recommend that the Commission on Christian Higher Education be made a prior claim against this fund. We further recommend that these funds be paid to the college currently and quarterly.

To keep our people informed concerning the importance of Christian Higher Education, we recommend that Sunday, November 12, 1961 be observed as College Day in all our churches and that observance of this day be enhanced by the use of college representatives in our churches as far as possible. Two special features should be lifted up in the observance of College Day. FIRST—that parents should be encouraged to send their sons and daughters to Methodist Colleges. SECOND—that our people be urged to support our colleges financially and that special emphasis be laid on paying our pledge in full on the current campaign for the support of our Methodist Colleges.

***REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CONFERENCE ENTERTAINMENT**

After careful study, the Conference Committee on Entertainment finds that it is costing the Annual Conference approximately \$8,000.00 annually to entertain the Conference.

The cost for Conference entertainment is paid from the Conference Benevolences, and we do not feel justified in taking this amount of money each year from so many needy causes to entertain the Annual Conference. We also know that this amount will continue to increase as the Conference grows.

Therefore, we propose that each charge shall set up in its local budget the sum of \$50.00 to cover the amount needed by the minister and delegate from each charge, and the money be paid directly to the minister and delegate. Each minister and delegate coming from a minimum salary charge or less would receive \$8.00 per diem from the

allocation for Conference Entertainment. The same arrangement shall apply to retired ministers.

Our study shows that it is becoming increasingly hard to find rooms for the delegates by the local church entertaining the Conference. It is with this in mind that we propose the \$8.00 per day to cover room and board for each delegate. The local church entertaining the Conference would set up a housing committee, through which rooms could be reserved.

We believe that such an arrangement will make it much easier for the local Church to find rooms for the delegates and it will save the Conference Benevolences approximately \$8,000.00 annually.

Such an arrangement will also make it easier for the Conference Committee to find churches willing to entertain the Conference.

Other Conferences have adopted this same plan and have found that it has solved many of their problems in entertainment.

We propose that this plan become effective for the 1962 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

I

THE PAST YEAR

In keeping with the quadrennial emphasis of the General Board of Evangelism, "Jesus Christ Is Lord," the Conference Board of Evangelism, through its executive committee and district secretaries worked out a suggestive program of evangelism designed to strengthen the local church. This program was flexible so it could be adapted to meet the needs of the district and the local church.

Each district superintendent and district secretary of evangelism studied this program and selected that part of it which would meet the needs of the particular district.

The Raleigh District Superintendent had the conference director meet with the district committee on evangelism as a resource person. At this meeting a district "Day-Apart" was planned for pastors on November 28. Dr. Carl Sanders, District Superintendent of the Richmond District of the Virginia Conference was the inspirational speaker. Bishop Moore was the speaker at the District Rally held at Hayes Barton Methodist Church. The week of February 19 was a week of Visitation Evangelism in the district with over 60% of the churches participating. The goal for the district was set at a net gain of 1,000 members.

The superintendent of the Wilmington District called a meeting of his pastors at the Good Shepherd Home at Lake Waccamaw. Dr. D. E. Earnhardt was the inspirational speaker at the Sunday night service, September 16. The service was closed with the preachers around the altar in a service of dedication. Plans were made at this "Day-Apart" for a district visitation effort at the Sunset Park Methodist Church, February 27 to March 2. Ministers and laymen visited two by two. This was followed by a week of revival preaching with the conference director as evangelist.

The New Bern District had its Pastors' "Retreat by the Sea" at Atlantic Beach, September 30. Dr. D. E. Earnhardt was the inspirational speaker, captivating and challenging the ministers in his earnest appeal to win souls for Christ. In the afternoon the conference director explained the program of evangelism for the year and each sub-district met and adapted the program to its individual needs. The district secretary offered his service to help make every charge in the district a fruitful charge.

The Elizabeth City District planned an overnight pastors' "Day-Apart" at South Mills October 6 and 7. Features of this program were (1) a sharing session of "personal witness of recent victories," (2) two inspiring messages by the Reverend Calvin Johnson, pastor of Christ's Church, Newport News, Virginia, (3) the presentation of evangelistic plans for the conference year by the conference director, and (4) closing with an altar service and dedication.

The Rocky Mount District held its "Day-Apart" pastors' meeting at Tarboro from 4:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. October 7. Dr. D. E. Earnhardt was the inspirational speaker. Reverend Leon Couch spoke on "One Great Day of Witnessing;" and Reverend J. B. Speight told "How It Was Done at Evansdale." The conference director spoke on "Getting Ready for Visiting." The service closed with a dedication service around the altar.

The Durham District began its evangelistic program with the Orange County Fall Christian Life Mission, October 9-14 at the Cameron Park School Auditorium, Hillsboro, with Dr. Clovis Chappell as the guest speaker.

Two "Morning-Apart" meetings were held for the pastors of the Durham District, the first at McMannen Chapel on November 7, beginning with a breakfast at 8:00 a.m., so that the student pastors could attend. Dr. Earnhardt was the main speaker. There was a period of group sharing, a session on methods, closing with a service of consecration around the altar.

The second "Morning-Apart" was held on Monday, March 27, 9:30-1:00. A World-Service film was shown and used as a basis for discussion. After the discussion groups, the new order of Communion Service was used for the celebration of the Lord's Supper. The ministers were high in their praise of these two "Mornings-Apart."

The Reverend M. W. Lawrence, Superintendent of the Goldsboro District, at a regular meeting of his pastors, presented plans for a "Day-Apart" Pastors' retreat. The retreat was held at Salem Church, October 31. The program consisted of an inspirational address by Dr. D. E. Earnhardt, group meditations on Psalm 51:10-13, a session on tools and techniques, closing with dedication and altar service.

On September 18-20, Dr. Harry Denman was the evangelist at the Sampson County Evangelistic meeting at Roseboro.

On November 28-December 2, the Goldsboro subdistrict conducted a five day laymen's training revival at St. Luke Church in Goldsboro, beginning at 7:30 each evening.

March 19-24, the Kenansville subdistrict put on a training revival, meeting each evening from 7:30 to 9:00 o'clock. The district director taught a class each evening on "Educational Evangelism." A different minister each evening gave training in techniques of visitation evangelism, and there was a closing sermon by a different pastor each evening. This training revival was well attended.

The Smithfield subdistrict had three nights for God Visitation Evangelism, March 16, 17, and 18.

The Burlington District held a "Day-Apart" meeting at the Graham Methodist Church on November 13 from 3:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. One hour was spent in group meetings where the ministers shared experiences. The conference director led a discussion on the methods to be used in carrying out the program of evangelism in the local church. Dr. Clegg outlined the program of evangelism in the district as follows: Each pastor will be expected to do two things: plan for and conduct (1) visitation evangelism in each church and (2) revival in each church. All the churches of the district came together for a great union service at 7:30 with Dr. D. E. Earnhardt bringing the message. He closed the service with a period of dedication around the altar.

The Fayetteville District had two "Day-Apart" meetings with ministers, one at Laurel Hill February 6 and one at Lyon Memorial Methodist Church in Fayetteville on February 7. The Troy subdistrict conducted three nights for God Visitation Evangelism at Mt. Gilead, Biscoe, and Troy.

The Board of Evangelism co-operates with other boards in a program of orientation for pastors new to the North Carolina Conference. The conference director and the

Reverend W. K. Quick gave the training in evangelism at the school at Camp Don-Lee, August 23-25.

One of the highlights of the year was the Pastors' Conference on Evangelism at Louisburg College, August 30-September 1. Over 200 pastors were in attendance. This conference is sponsored jointly by the Conference Board of Evangelism and the Town and Country Commission. The conference director is the chairman of the Board of Managers.

The conference director has edited four lectures in "Basic Training in Evangelism" as follows: (1) History and Organization of The Methodist Church, (2) Basic Beliefs of a Methodist, (3) Motives of Evangelism, and (4) The Necessity of Prayer in Evangelism (this lecture written by Dr. Howard P. Powell). Copies of the lectures are distributed to each pupil who follows as the lecturer reads. At the close of the lecture, there is a period for questions and discussion. There is Bible memory work to be used in witnessing. The only expense to the local church will be the return of the lectures to Clinton. These lectures can be used in adult membership classes; men's club programs, W S C S programs, basic training for evangelistic visitors, and Commissions on Membership and Evangelism. They have been tried out and can be recommended.

II

RECOMMENDATIONS

We recommend the reappointment of the Reverend C. Freeman Heath as Conference Director of Evangelism, and we recommend the reappointment of the Reverend Tommy Tyson as Conference Evangelist.

III

THE NEW YEAR

The Board of Evangelism will co-operate with the other Conference Boards in the orientation of pastors new to the North Carolina Conference. The Conference director will represent our Board at this school August 21-22.

Plans have been completed for a great Pastors' Conference on Evangelism at Louisburg College, September 5, 6, and 7, 1961. Dr. A. Purnell Bailey will be the guest minister, Dr. Leslie Ross from the General Board will be our methods leader, and Dr. James L. Robertson, pastor of Clarendon Methodist Church, Arlington, Virginia, and also Virginia Conference Secretary of Evangelism, will lead the men in the prayer emphasis.

Our program for the past conference year was prepared after annual conference and therefore had to be purely voluntary on the part of the districts and churches. We appreciate the fine spirit of co-operation on the part of the district superintendents, pastors and local churches in taking hold of the program and seeking to use it in winning unreached people to Christ and His Church.

We feel that this program has prepared both pastors and lay people for a "United Witness for Christ and His Church." It is the prayer of this Board that we may be able to train the local commission on membership and evangelism to undergird the church with a dynamic program of evangelism. To do this we must lead church members to be dynamic disciples, growing disciples, believing disciples, Bible reading disciples, praying disciples, witnessing disciples and recruiting disciples. We believe that a people genuinely concerned about the souls of men, dynamic disciples, will by the help of God, win thousands to Christ and His Church. To this end we present our program for 1961-1962, which is a joint program with the Board of Education with the other boards co-operating.

**METHODIST HOME FOR CHILDREN
REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT**

We are glad to bring you a report of another year of achievement at your Methodist Home for Children in Raleigh. Our last year's dreams of two new cottages are fast becoming a reality. The M. B. Smith Cottage and the L. S. Massey Cottage should be ready for occupancy during the early fall.

Approximately 3,000 Methodists attended our promotional meetings this year, which is an increase over the previous year. We are thrilled with the good response shown by those interested persons. Two concrete evidences of this are: (1) We received two beautiful pianos, and (2) the Thanksgiving Special increased from \$4,800 last year to better than \$11,000 this year which is to be used on our new chapel. We would like to express our sincere appreciation for this offering of love for a hoped-for chapel at the Methodist Home for Children. The fall promotional meeting dates of 1961 have been waived in behalf of the program of the Board of Evangelism.

Our cost of living is rising just as it is for smaller family units throughout eastern North Carolina. The over-all cost of child care last year was \$5.34 per day per child. Our one desire is to buy the best services for the child that the church can afford. What are some of the specifics that have upped our cost of per day care? Here are a few: (1) We have tried to emphasize individual care for the child in group living. (2) Labor, material, and food prices are higher. (3) Additional tutors for the slower students (Study Report Item 4, page VII) have been obtained. (4) According to Study Report of Methodist Home for Children May 1958, Page III, the following observation was made: "Size of groups of children in cottage units is too large." In April 1958 there were 188 children in the Home. We now have 150 children living on our campus. (5) We now have an excellent summer school program in which about 85 children participate. Many of our children have missed many days and weeks of schooling. (6) Three cottages have been renovated in order to serve breakfast (Study Report Item 1, page VII).

The Study Report referred to above was made by experts in child care from the National Board of Hospitals and Homes of the Methodist Church. The report further says (Item 37, page III): "over-all child care cost at Methodist Home for Children in Raleigh is not far from the median (meaning neither low nor high in cost of child care) cost per child day in other children's homes in the Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church." Item 46, page IV, of the Study states: "Methodist Home for Children will need increased conference apportionments, rather than reduced ones, if the agency is to inaugurate and carry out better services to children."

The Finance Committee of the Board of Trustees asked for an increase of \$13,000 in the regular operating budget. It also asked for \$30,000 for inaugurating a social service program (\$7,500 increase each year for four years) which would provide better case work for families and children already in care and a foster home program for 60 to 80 additional children. This would be the cheapest cost in an additional child care program. This, too, was recommended by the Study Report. The Commission on World Service and Finance has seen fit to recommend an increase of \$4,000 for which we will be grateful. You can help us by supplementing this through your Special Thanksgiving Offering which will be used in our operating expenses.

May I take this opportunity to thank the following vital persons: (1) Our staff; (2) our trustees ably led by Mr. C. A. Dillon; (3) Board of Hospitals and Homes; (4) Commission on World Service and Finance; and (5) the Cabinet and our wonderful Bishop Garber.

May I again thank each of you for your interest, concern, and support. Please remember us in your prayers and in your wills. Thank you for the privilege of serving as your superintendent of our Home for Children.

Report No. 2**REPORT OF THE METHODIST RETIREMENT HOME, INC.****I**

The Methodist Retirement Home is owned and operated by the North Carolina Conference and represents one of the Conference's finest efforts to meet the needs of people in the name of Christ and His Church. The Home serves a two-fold purpose. It offers companionship, love and security to many who are tired of living alone, who are afraid for the future, and who need the services the Home offers. At the same time, the Home has available the finest facilities for retirement in eastern North Carolina.

The Home is governed by a Board of Trustees elected by the Annual Conference. The nine districts of the Conference are represented on this Board. In addition to the forty-five elected members, there are honorary members and ex-officio members. These are the Bishop of the Conference, the District Superintendents, the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the President of the Home's Auxiliary, the Treasurer of the Conference, the President of the Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes and the Chairman of the Retirement Home Committee of the Board of Hospitals and Homes.

The original building occupied in 1955 had a capacity of forty-four. Expanded facilities in 1959 raised this to 130. The first four of the Home's apartments added eight to this number. Eight additional apartments will be completed in July, 1961.

Adequate facilities and program are available so that the members of the Home live a well-rounded, happy life. There is a religious environment, with a devotional service each morning before breakfast, Bible class and Sunday worship services. Wholesome meals are served with special attention given to diets which are ordered by the doctor.

The occupational therapy, social and recreational programs mean that there need not be idle hands nor minds.

The entire top floor of the new building is allocated to the infirmary. These facilities can be easily expanded to take in the top floor of the original building thereby giving one-third of the total capacity of the Home to the infirmary. This will be needed for the normal operation of the Home, so that nursing cases as such cannot be accepted.

The infirmary is well-planned, well-equipped, and well-staffed. The Home's medical and nursing service, along with the services available through cooperation with Duke Hospital, assure that the members receive the best medical and nursing care available.

This is not a nursing home, but a retirement home, accepting those who are reasonably able to look after themselves. It is prepared to keep persons for life once they are accepted. The requirements are a minimum age of 65, a life of service to the church and community, and a need for the services offered by the Home. Members are accepted on a monthly boarding basis or on a life contract.

Members who are able, are expected to pay as much as the cost of their keep, and in addition, are urged to make gifts to the Home. No one has yet been turned away because of lack of finances. This is made possible by generous contributions from friends of the Home.

The monthly rate of \$160 charged by the Home to those who pay the cost of their care, provides room, board, laundry, the services of the Home's physician, the medicine he prescribes, the nursing and geriatric care, and the religious and social life in the Home. The average monthly payment by members is \$145. Only forty percent of the members pay as much as the cost of their care, while another forty percent are Old Age Assistance recipients. The Home can only continue to accept members like these through a liberal Mother's Day Offering and other special gifts made for this purpose.

Most of the members live in rooms in the main building. For those who want more room and privacy, there are apartments. Located near the main building, these offer all the privacy found in living in any community, plus the protection of the Retirement Home. Each apartment is self-contained with outside entrances, and is of fire-resistant construction. Each includes 1,000 square feet with screened porch, living room, kitchen, two bedrooms and full tile bath.

Members living in the apartments have available every service offered in the main buildings. The member can eat in the Home's dining room or cook in his apartment.

Those members of the Home who make an appropriate Capital Gift to the Home can have the privilege of living in an apartment; however, on doctor's orders or request they may move into the main building.

The Home has an equity of \$782,000 with an FHA-insured mortgage of \$500,000. This mortgage is for 38 years with the privilege of fifteen percent pre-payment per year without penalty.

The Home is supported by the local church through the part of the Annual Conference benevolences which come to the Retirement Home. The plans are to pay as much of this as possible on the reduction of the mortgage.

In addition to the Mother's Day Offering, special gifts which come to the Home for benevolent work and that part of the local church budget which comes to the Home, other sources of income are special gifts, wills and memorials. There are many opportunities for memorials at the Home. Plaques are placed on the door of a member's room on a contribution of \$350.00 for the furnishing of such a room or \$500.00 for an infirmary room. Persons often send contributions to the Home in memory of loved ones, and a card is sent to the family acknowledging this contribution. There is a memorial opportunity for any contribution that a person would like to make.

On Sunday, August 21, 1960, Bishop Garber dedicated the original building as a memorial to two Methodist ministers, Rev. Henry Hardy Gibbons and Rev. Lemuel Hardy Gibbons in recognition of the contributions made to the Home by the grandson and son of these two men.

Recognizing the fact that the Retirement Home is in a limited way meeting the needs of the senior citizens of our Conference, the Board of Trustees has appointed a Long-Range Planning Committee to seek ways to serve more fully the needs of our

retired people. The Board of Hospitals and Homes of the Conference has a similar committee that will work with this committee of the trustees of the Home.

Hundreds of serious inquiries concerning admission to the Home come each year, with an average of one application per week for membership. Along with the need for serving more of our retired people, is the need to provide facilities in a Christian environment to meet the needs of the chronically ill.

If we as Methodists are to accept the challenge of Christ to LOOK AFTER MY MOTHER, we must prepare to meet the needs of many more of our people.

The Chaplain's Program was not altered as it was felt by the Golden Cross Committee that this program was operating satisfactorily at this time.

The recommendation concerning the insurance program of the active ministers was that all active ministers be strongly urged to take it out on both their families and themselves.

REPORT OF BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

This Conference year has been a most eventful one for your Board of Lay Activities. One of the most significant and gratifying achievements has been the widespread acceptance of the Every Member Canvass program, instituted during the close of last Conference year. Reports from churches using the program came in after Annual Conference and indicated that of those churches using the program, it met with wonderful success. Of those who used it, their budgets averaged increasing by 14% while those who did not use it averaged only a 2.7% increase. This year tri-district training schools were again conducted, followed by district and sub-district schools. The majority of our churches are now using the program and it is strongly urged that every one use it. The response has been overwhelmingly enthusiastic. Increased financial support for our church's causes has become available, and we North Carolina Methodists are becoming increasingly aware of the total program of our church and our responsibilities in its work in building the kingdom of God.

The EMC program is a continuing one and according to the Discipline shall be put on each year in each church. It should become a regular and normal part of each

church's activities. Because it has been so widely accepted throughout the Conference, the Board will not offer schools for EMC this year. It is a local church program and should need no further promotion from the Conference level. However, the members of the Board do stand ready to go on call to any church which might need help in starting or improving the program.

The Annual Laymen's Retreat was held at Duke University on August 20-21, with Bishop Garber, Matt Howell, and Paul Hardin, III as speakers. It was one of the most inspirational retreats we have had in many years. Retreat this year will come on August 19-20 again at Duke, beginning in the early afternoon.

The Third National Conference of Methodist Men meets at Purdue University on July 14, 15, 16, 1961. Our goal for this quadrennial conference is a delegation of at least 100 men from our Conference to this great meeting of laymen from all parts of the nation.

The Lay Rallies with highly inspirational talks by Bishop Garber and Red Bond were the best attended of any thus far. Attendance went over 5,500. Our rallies this year will come February 5-16.

The No Silent Pulpit program was again carried out but with fewer pulpits to be filled because of the increasing number of churches becoming stations. Our dedicated laymen who serve in this capacity make up the largest group of Lay Speakers in any of Methodism's many conferences. The General Conference in Denver set up a program for training of Certified Lay Speakers and plans are underway to give the course in our Conference. The No Silent Pulpit program begins this year on March 11. Pastors of churches participating in the program are urged to contact the Lay Speaker assigned to fill their pulpits prior to the date set in order to be sure that arrangements are complete.

All churches are urged to observe Laymen's Day on October 15.

In the field of Methodist Men it has been felt that our newly-elected officers needed some guidance in their duties. Accordingly, during the months of August and September District Workshops will be conducted for them. It has been recommended now for some time that all officers be elected in May to take office in July. Schools for the 1962-63 year will come in June, 1962.

Our Board is ready to cooperate fully with the Boards of Evangelism and Education in the great program of evangelism and establishment of outpost church schools that is planned for the coming year. Many of our Lay Speakers will be of particular help in teaching in the newly-formed outpost schools.

It is particularly gratifying to see our church lay leaders becoming more and more real servants of the local church. For many years it has been largely an honorary position. However, through the efforts of the pastors and others, local church leaders are assuming their rightful share of the duties in their churches and are becoming as the Discipline sets forth the right arms of their pastors.

We would like to express our deepest gratitude to those who made it possible for the Conference Lay Leader to spend a year on full-time basis for the work of the Board.

REPORT OF LONG-RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE

1. The 1960 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference adopted the following recommendation from Long-Range Planning Committee, with respect to redistricting the Conference:

"We find a probable need for an additional district or districts. In view of the forthcoming census, which will reveal populations and population trends, we recommend that the study of new districts be continued with recommendations to be made to the 1961 session of the Annual Conference."

After study, the sub-committee of Long Range, composed of C. D. Barclift, W. L.

Clegg, J. Nelson Gibson, Jr., A. J. Hobbs, and Key W. Taylor, recommends to the 1961 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference,

That the number of districts for the conference year 1961-1962 remain the same as this year, and that the committee be continued to give further study to the proposal.

2. The 1960 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference adopted the following recommendation from Long-Range Planning Committee:

"Long Range recommends that the Conference appoint a Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information, permitted by paragraph 1590, 1956 Discipline, and that the said commission study the needs of the Conference along this line, and make its recommendation to the 1961 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference."

On April 24, 1961, Dallas Mallison, Chairman, Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information, asked for a clarification by Long Range as to whether or not the intent was that the commission be set up for one year or for the quadrennium. Since the above recommendation does not specify a time element, and since the Conference appointed said commission to study the needs of the Conference along this line and to report to the 1961 session, Long Range feels it has fulfilled its obligations at this point, and further recommendations should be the responsibility of the Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information.

3. During the year the Commission on World Service and Finance shared with Long Range Planning Committee their feeling that there is a self-evident need for a major capital funds campaign to be conducted in the conference in the near future to strengthen further the conference institutions and agencies. Long Range definitely feels that the welfare and interests of our educational institutions and allied causes would best be served during the next year by the Conference's giving primary attention in an attempt to secure full payments of the pledges made in the 1958 major funds campaign.

METHODIST BUILDING COMMITTEE

Construction on the new Conference building to provide facilities for conference offices and for meetings of groups up to 100 is proceeding on schedule and is to be completed on January 28, 1962. The rental wing and a small part of the Conference wing will be leased to provide income for building operations and to retire the debt for the cost of construction. The second floor of the rental wing has been leased to an insurance company of national scope and other prospective tenants are in sufficient number to assure us full occupancy of our rental space. The prospective income from leases is up to our estimates. The cost of the building is within our budget of \$650,000.

The need for financial support as indicated in the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance is essential and adequate until the building is occupied and permanent financing effected.

We appreciate the support of the Conference in this project.

METHODIST FOUNDATION, INC.

I

This agency of the Annual Conference operates under charter approved by action of the Conference. It is under the direction of a board of 20 members elected by agencies of the conference (See 1960 Conference *Journal*, pages 205 to 214 for a comprehensive report of the Foundation),

As shown in the annual reports of the Foundation for 1956 and following years, this corporate body, in addition to its activities in the Department of Gifts and Wills, is serving as an investment agency for the Annual Conference and any or all of its agencies desiring to use its services. (Reference DISCIPLINE 1960, paragraph 1610.1-1610.2). The funds of the member agencies are received at stated periods and credited as Capital Units based on current value per unit according to appraisal at said stated period. All funds are then "commingled" and each agency owns its pro-rata part of each investment and of cash on hand.

This procedure as previously reported and accepted by the Annual Conference results in diversification and better security of the investment of each member and is similar to the practice of the General Board of Pensions in investing the funds entrusted to it by the several annual conferences and as reported in the annual reports of said board.

We do, therefore, request the conference by the adoption of this report to affirm its acceptance of our prior reports and to approve the continuance of the "commingling" of funds in Methodist Foundation, Inc. in investment for any and all conference agencies.

We further recommend that the annual reports of the audit of accounts of the Conference Treasurer for Methodist Foundation, Inc., published in the *Journal* from year to year be approved as sufficient permanent records of the transactions between the several agencies and the Foundation and such reports shall be the equivalent of certificates of ownership by the various agencies for their investment in the Foundation.

As reported in the 1960 Conference *Journal* on page 211, the directors of the Foundation permit withdrawal of Capital Units based upon values as determined by the directors of the Foundation.

II

DEPARTMENT OF GIFTS AND WILLS

F. OLEN HUNT, D.D., *Director*

Building by gifts and wills is nothing new—this conference has long been such a beneficiary. Because of the increasing demands made upon the institutions, boards, commissions, and agencies of the conference, it was deemed wise to give special emphasis to the making of bequests by wills and to the giving of gifts annually as a tax advantage to the donor.

The Gifts and Wills Department of the Methodist Foundation is spear heading this movement by distribution of the Methodist Foundation News, leaflets, pamphlets, and brochures. Also by the Director preaching in the churches, speaking to Methodist Men, official boards, finance committees and other groups, not only about the Methodist Foundation program, but assisting in Every Member Canvass instruction, guidance and counselling for building fund crusades, classes in tithing and stewardship, as well as promoting all the causes of the conference. He speaks from vast experience in these areas.

Our colleges have been established on gifts and bequests and must be maintained by them. Many churches have realized on wills in sizeable amounts. A review and partial summary of the record of past gifts and bequests may assist us in visualizing the great potential of steady and persistent emphasis on this opportunity to all people who have the desire to promote God's will by a bequest in the will or by special gift.

The Conference Board of Trustees has a present investment in Methodist Foundation worth \$300,000.00 which has grown by prudent investment by the Trustees from bequests totaling \$71,279.00, left as endowment for retired ministers.

Interest totaling more than the original bequests has been disbursed by the Trustees to the Conference Board of Pensions, yet the principal is now more than four fold the original gifts. These gifts originated thus:

The Superintendent of the Retirement Home shows \$155,545.00 since its beginning in large gifts and bequests by wills. Also memorials in the amount of \$12,791.81.

The auditors report of our Childrens Home shows that \$95,564.03 was received during their latest fiscal year from bequests and special gifts.

Our mission program has benefited in recent years from several bequests, one as a direct result of the work of Methodist Foundation.

Our goal is every member of the North Carolina Conference making a will and leaving a stated sum, a percentage amount, or a tithe of their estate to the causes of the church through the Methodist Foundation. Three hundred and forty-six persons have indicated they have written, will write, or put a codicil to existing wills leaving some amount to Conference causes. During the year one within the family of Methodist Foundation in her passing left a tithe of her estate to the causes of the conference. Such a small percentage of our members have made wills that it is appalling.

We urge each pastor to make a will, leaving a tithe of his estate to the conference causes, preach one sermon a year on stewardship of possessions, forever urging his members to make wills remembering the conference causes, and appointing a Gifts and Wills Committee, sending their names and addresses to the Gifts and Wills Department of Methodist Foundation; and we will provide material for distribution to the congregation. Co-operation and unselfish promotion at the local church level will reap unexpected returns to the local church.

We have presented above a summary of gifts and bequests of substantial total which have been received as the result of little emphasis from the church. The church leadership has faith that the greater emphasis being given through the Department of Gifts and Wills will inspire thousands of Methodists and others to share their means and their estates with the church for the work of the Lord.

Methodist Foundation, Inc. is prepared to carry out the wishes of the donor or the legator in making provision for or distribution of gifts, bequests or proceeds of endowment to annual conference causes or agencies or to local church. Where funds are received without directions, the distribution will be by annual conference approval.

METHODIST STUDENT CENTER — GREENVILLE

The program of the Wesley Foundation this year has been designed and carried out with the purpose of creating an atmosphere within which a Christian community might develop. The emphasis of the program was THE MISSION OF THE CHURCH WITHIN THE ACADEMIC COMMUNITY. There was, first of all, a recognition of our need to understand the meaning of the church as the Christian community if we were to realize the purpose of our Wesley Foundation—to be the ministry of the church within the academic community.

During the first quarter of the college year the program was planned to bring our students into the fellowship of the Methodist Student Center; to acquaint them with the purpose of the Wesley Foundation and into active participation in the ministry of the church to the campus. A special "Methodist orientation" was carried on as a part of the College Freshmen Orientation program. A Sunday school class for college students was held at the Student Center on Sunday mornings, at which time Bible study was led by the director. A time of fellowship was held just before the class, in the Lounge, at which time buns, coffee and cocoa were served. A Fellowship Supper was served on Monday evenings and a vesper program within the area of student interest.

In the second quarter a Freshmen Council was formed by the director, composed of freshman students who had been active in the Wesley Foundation program. This developed into a study group which began with a study of the purpose and program of the Wesley Foundation. The group met weekly and after a few weeks entered into a study of the Christian community—the church, using the book, "LIFE TOGETHER," by Dietrich Bonhoeffer. A study group was formed within the WF Council for the same study, also using this book as a basis. Both groups met weekly for the remainder of the year under the leadership of the director. The emphasis of the Bible study on Sunday mornings was "The Cost of Discipleship," using the book by that title by Bonhoeffer. This was also the theme for special weekly services during Lent and during Holy Week,

culminating in Holy Communion in the chapel of the Center at 7:00 a.m. Thursday before the students left for Easter vacation.

One outcome of the study groups was a decision of the WF Council to postpone the regular election of officers until a later date in the spring, to dissolve this year's Council and to continue their study of the Christian community. Fifteen of the twenty-one students in the two study groups went on a Retreat with the director, held at Camp Leach the weekend of April 8-9. The Rev. Robert L. Johnson, director of the Wesley Foundation at the University of North Carolina, led the Retreat group into a deeper consideration of the meaning of Christian community, of the individual's membership in this community and the responsibility for making a witness for Christ in involvement in the life of the academic community. After the Retreat a careful study was made of the needs and opportunities of our own campus and a committee was chosen to work out a suggested program for the coming year and an organization through which this program would be carried out.

Because of a change in the policy of the Methodist Student Movement the National Society of Wesley Players was discontinued and a Commission of Fine Arts was set up. Our Alpha Zeta Chapter of Wesley Players, therefore, ceased to exist, but a drama group continued under direction of one of our students. A playlet was presented for the Mission Study Class of the Woman's Society of Christian Service at Jarvis Memorial Church and later for a similar group at St. James Church. A three-act play, "DEATH TAKES A HOLIDAY," was produced during the winter quarter and presented in two performances to very appreciative audiences at the Student Center. A one-act play, "HE CAME SEEING," was presented, upon request, for the MYF New Bern District Rally at Centenary Church, and later in the Wesley Foundation at the Student Center.

A joint vesper with the Canterbury Club was held at the Center as a part of the East Carolina College Conference on DATING, ENGAGEMENT AND MARRIAGE. Dr. Malene Irons and Dr. Harold Hoke, both of Greenville, led the two discussions at his vesper for men and women students. Participation in this conference was upon invitation of the college administration.

A Talent Show was presented by the Commission on Recreation, on the stage at the Student Center, in which twenty-five students took part. Informal groups have enjoyed the fellowship of the Student Center and special recreational events have been held.

Our WF has had representation on the Campus Inter-Religious Council and the weekly meetings of this Council have been held at our Student Center.

Two students and the director attended the State MSM Retreat at Camp Chestnut Ridge in October. Four students and the director attended the MSM Conference on Inter-racial Tensions held in Winston-Salem. Nineteen students and the director attended the N. C. State MSM Conference in Durham in January. Anne Campbell, one of our sophomore students, was elected to membership on the State MSM Council this year.

The director, as loan officer for the Methodist Loan Fund at ECC, has assisted eleven students to obtain loans from this fund in the amount of \$3,515.00.

The director has had 642 personal conferences with students during the year.

The enrollment at East Carolina for fall quarter (largest of year) was 4,599; winter quarter 4,405; spring quarter 4,271. Of the largest enrollment 4,599, 992 were Methodists. On campus and in town 933—married and graduate—77, freshmen 447, upperclassmen 468. Single undergraduates: men 424; women 491. Of the 933 on campus and in town, our program reached 316. Of this number 162 were vitally affected by the program. This is only an estimate on the basis of participation in the WF program. It is impossible to determine the number whose lives have been changed or transformed by the ministry of the church within the academic community. Three hundred eight Methodist students have visited the Student Center this year; 446 non-Methodists. One hundred fifty-one Methodists have visited the Center four or more times; 91 non-Methodists. One hundred fifty-nine students have attended the Sunday school class on Sunday mornings; 37 students have visited this class during year, making a total attendance of 196. Of the 159 attending 105 were freshmen. Regular in attendance 84; freshmen 7, upperclassmen 27.

The students from the WF Council and the twelve in the Freshman Council—total of 21—who have continued in the study groups, have shown evidence of a deepening understanding of the meaning of Christian community and in personal Christian living. Many others have participated in the program throughout the year and have gained a better understanding of the meaning of involvement in the Christian community.

As a result of this study, the students carefully considered the suggestions brought by their Planning Committee and five officers were elected to study and evaluate the WF program and suggest plans for carrying out the program during the year. This Program Committee selected coordinators for these areas: Worship, Outreach, Service, Fellowship, Special Events, Fine Arts, Hospitality, Public Relations—the area of Study and Nurture to be the responsibility of the Program Committee and the director. The five elected officers and coordinators with the director will compose the Wesley Foundation Council. All these members of WF Council were chosen because of their commitment to the Christian faith and their service through the Wesley Foundation during this year.

The program for the coming year includes special emphasis upon study and outreach. The students this year have learned the value of study groups and the need to make a special effort to reach a greater number of students on our campus and bring them into the Christian community.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARY

Ours is a great Conference, as measured by its remarkable progress in almost every phase of its activities. But one of its finer achievements is in its program of Minimum Salary. This progress has been effected through the cooperation of the Commission on World Service and Finance, the district superintendents, and every other member of our Conference. All of us can thus take pride in our accomplishments, while pressing forward in the achievement of further progress.

We regret that we are unable to make an increase in Minimum Salary for the Conference year 1961-1962, but with the approval of the 1961 Annual Conference, we do anticipate a raise in minimum salary for the following year 1962-1963. To effect this raise, the Commission recommends a ten percent increase in the Minimum Salary Fund as apportioned to the various charges of the Conference.

We recommend for the Conference year 1961-1962 that the salary for those serving pastoral appointments be supported at the following minimum levels:

\$3,300.00 for a full-time single minister.

\$3,600.00 for a full-time married minister.

\$4,000.00 for a full-time married minister with one dependent child or more.

For student pastors serving pastoral appointments we recommend that the salary be supported at the following minimum levels:

\$1,800.00 for a single minister serving as a student pastor.

\$2,000.00 for a married minister serving as a student pastor.

\$2,200.00 for a married minister with one dependent child serving as a student pastor.

\$2,400.00 for a married minister with 2 or more dependent children serving as a student pastor.

In addition to this support for student pastors, their salary shall be increased by an allowance relative to the distance of their charge from the school they attend. When the charge is within 25 miles of their school, it shall be by \$100.00. When the charge is between 25 and 50 miles from the school, it shall be increased by \$200.00; when the charge is beyond 50 miles and within 75 miles of the school, \$300.00; when the charge is beyond 75 miles and within 100 miles of the school, \$400.00; and when the charge is beyond 100 miles, \$500.00 as a minimum increment.

In order to achieve these goals and to plan for a new quadrennium, we encourage the wholehearted support of each pastoral charge now receiving minimum salary support to raise the level of ministerial support by the church or churches now served. As

this support is increased, more funds will be freed to raise the general level of salaries. Unless this general promotion is followed, our bases cannot be stabilized and plans for growth will be impossible to fulfill.

And while commending the work of the district superintendents for their concern for both the program of our Commission and the support of ministers working under them, we again urge that they be guided by "The Principles Governing the Use of Minimum Salary Funds" as found on pages 213-217 of the Journal of Proceedings of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, 1958, which shall apply as printed except as regards minimum salary items as amended by the action of the current report.

BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS

I. General Report

The Board is endeavoring to administer the **Discipline** as it understands it, with fairness and impartiality to every candidate for the ministry, and with a deep sense of moral responsibility to the Conference and the church as well as to the candidates in upholding the standards for the ministry.

We began this quadrennium with a needed increase in the membership of the Board. We began it with only a few experienced members. We are studying our task diligently with the purpose of strengthening the ministry. Whatever progress has been made may be attributed in large measure to the dedication and cooperation within the membership of the Board and the assistance and cooperation of the bishop and the cabinet and the district committees on Ministerial Qualifications.

On December 8, 1960, the Board had a workshop at the Retirement Home in Durham, to which the cabinet and the district committees on Ministerial Qualifications were invited. The purpose of the meeting was to study the 1960 legislation with reference to the ministry, complete the organization of the Board and make plans for the future. An **Approved Supply** section of the Board was organized, with C. W. Barbee as chairman and H. B. Lewis as registrar. In keeping with the **Discipline** 322.4 the Board approved the use of psychological tests for all candidates and elected the following **Committee on Psychological Testing**: A. F. Fisher, chairman; Kimsey King, and J. Sidney Epperson. The **Minnesota Multi-phasic Personality Inventory** was adopted and administered to all candidates interviewed (See Report No. 2). Other committees include **Student Work**, with Kimsey King, chairman; R. W. Bradshaw, H. S. Garris, and J. H. Sutton, Jr.; **Understanding the Christian Faith and the Methodist Church**, with H. B. Lewis, chairman; J. Sidney Epperson, and A. C. Lee.

The Board has approved the publishing of a pamphlet to guide candidates into the Methodist ministry. A clarification of a number of matters pertaining to the Methodist ministry is needed. We need a guide in using the **Discipline** in matters pertaining to the the ministry. We hope that the next General Conference will rewrite the whole section in the **Discipline** on "The Ministry."

The Board will meet on December 8, 1961, at the Retirement Home in Durham for the purpose of evaluating the work of the past year and making further plans for the future. The cabinet and the district committees on Ministerial Qualifications will be invited to attend.

It is the policy of the Board to have a personal interview with each man each year. This is done two days at First Church, Wilson, in April, and at the Duke Divinity School one day in May (See Conference Calendar), and the day Conference convenes.

Recommendations are as follows:

1. That the Conference request each district committee on Ministerial Qualifications to require written work for license to preach and the grading of examinations on "Studies for License to Preach" through the Correspondence Department of Ministerial Education, Nashville, Tennessee.

2. That all men endeavor to attend and pursue their studies in colleges and theological schools related to the Methodist Church, particularly schools approved by the University Senate.

3. That all men in the Course of Study be encouraged to attend the Approved Pastors' Schools held at Duke and Emory and that financial assistance be continued as funds are available. Those who cannot attend summer school must complete each year's work by correspondence.

4. That a concerted effort be made toward securing highly qualified young men and women for full-time Christian service, and that each minister give special attention to this most important matter.

5. That **Ministry Sunday**, the quadrennial emphasis on recruitment for the ministry, be observed by every local church, and that the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications cooperate with other agencies of the Conference in promoting **Ministry Sunday**. By action of the General Conference, "the Sunday of or preceding May 24 (Aldersgate Sunday)" (paragraph 296, 2.d **Discipline**), **Ministry Sunday** is intended to interpret to Methodists the significance of the ministry. The purpose of the day is the presentation of the work of the minister, his motivations for entering the ministry, the divine call, the academic and spiritual preparation involved. The **Methodist Story** for April features material for **Ministry Sunday**.

6. That the Orientation Workshop for Pastors New to the North Carolina Conference held at Camp Don-Lee in August be continued and that the Commission on World Service and Finance be requested to make provision for financing it.

7. That the Annual Conference approve the One Percent Plan for the Southeastern Jurisdiction Fund for Ministerial Education and commend its appeal to the favorable action of the local churches within its boundaries. Each local church would be urged to make an annual appropriation equal to one percent of its operational budget to this fund for ministerial education.

II. Report on Psychological Testing

In accordance with paragraph 322.4 of the 1960 **Discipline**, it was decided to administer a personality inventory to every candidate for the ministry coming before the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications. It was decided that such an inventory would not be used finally to determine a candidate's qualification or lack of qualification for the ministry, but would be used as a diagnostic instrument to help refer individuals in need of further counsel to counseling agencies before they continue into the full-time traveling ministry. This will help prevent hasty decisions on the part of either the individual or the Board that could lead to real tragedy in a person's making the wrong vocational choice.

The Committee consulted with Dr. Richard A. Goodling, Professor of Pastoral Care of the Divinity School of Duke University, and Dr. W. G. Dahlstrom, Associate Professor of Psychology of the University of North Carolina. These men, to whom the committee pays tribute for the generous gift of their time and enthusiastic cooperation, both suggested the use of the **Minnesota Multi-phasic Personality**. Copies of the inventory were obtained and studied by the committee and arrangements were made to obtain multiple copies for administration to all candidates for the ministry. This was a fortunate choice in that the Divinity School of Duke University now administers this inventory to all students and, through the offices of Dr. Goodling and Dr. O. Kelly Ingram, the necessary results are made available to the committee. This eliminates overlapping in the administration of the inventory.

Although the administration and scoring of the inventory have been done by members of the committee, the interpretation of the results is done by professionally trained persons. Here again, Dr. Dahlstrom has given freely of his time to examine the inventory profiles of all ministerial candidates. Comments made by those qualified to interpret the inventories, not the direct inventory results, are used by the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications. Profiles are filed until a man is admitted into full connection, at which time they will be destroyed. The test papers are discarded immediately after the inventory. Thus the privacy of the individual is thoroughly respected and the results of the inventories cannot be used prejudicially. We emphasize that it is not the

desire of the committee or the Board to use the inventory preemptorily to eliminate candidates from the ministry. This committee recommends that next year we obtain the services of a psychiatrist who is a member of the North Carolina Annual Conference to sit in as advisor to the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications.

REPORT OF METHODIST MINISTERS' CREDIT UNION

The rapid growth of the Methodist Ministers' Credit Union in the last few months can best be understood and appreciated by a comparison of membership, assets, and service. The story of its growth is told in these tables:

It is evident that new life has come into this Credit Union during the past year and a half. The Credit Union lives to serve the members of the North Carolina Conference, the supply pastors, and the men on trial, and their families. The following are some of the services of the Credit Union:

1. Investment—Members invest their funds in shares and draw dividends. For the past two years the annual dividend declared has been 4%.
2. Life Savings Insurance—Your savings are matched with an equal amount of FREE life insurance, provided the investment is made before age 55. Investments made later give you a smaller amount of free life insurance.
3. Loans—The Credit Union offers two types of loans:
 - a. Loans for any provident purpose, such as moving, medical expenses, consolidation of bills, vacation, education, cars, etc.
 - b. Estate Loans—In this type of loan the money borrowed is invested in Credit Union shares, which begin to draw dividends immediately and assure you FREE life insurance in the amount of the loan in most cases. You also get FREE loan protection insurance in the amount of the unpaid balance. In this way you begin to build an insured estate to meet the future needs of your family.
- Signature loans of either type are made up to \$500.00 to Credit Union members. Above this amount, security must be provided satisfactory to the Credit Committee. Loans to individuals are limited to 10% of the paid-in shares of the Credit Union.
4. Loan Protection Insurance—This FREE insurance pays the unpaid balance of your loan in case of death or permanent disability.
5. Confidential counsel in your financial problems.
6. Low Interest Rate—Through the Credit Union you are protected against the exorbitant usury rates charged by many of the leading agencies in our state. The Credit

Union can never charge more than 1% per month on the unpaid balance of your loan. There are no hidden fees in the Credit Union.

The Methodist Ministers' Credit Union is chartered by the State of North Carolina, and its books are audited periodically by the Credit Union Division of the Department of Agriculture. All persons handling Credit Union funds are bonded. Our Credit Union has never in its 23-year history written off one debt as uncollectable. We have only one note dated prior to April 11, 1960.

You will note that the shares increased from \$8,029.41 as of April 17 to \$9,361.41 on May 23.

REPORT OF BOARD OF MISSIONS

Under the capable leadership of the officers and members of the North Carolina Annual Conference Board of Missions—plus the untiring work of the laymen and co-operation of the Cabinet—your Board of Missions is happy to report continuing progress in the area of work committed to its charge.

No small amount of recognition should be given to the sincere and loyal work of those laymen who hold membership on the board and give guidance to our endeavors. The enthusiastic and enlightened devotion of our executive secretary, the Reverend O. L. Hathaway, through which he has made untiring efforts to both stimulate and promote the total program of missions is worthy of commendation. We are indebted to him for his untiring service and recommend his re-appointment as executive secretary of the North Carolina Annual Conference Board of Missions for the ensuing year.

Your Board is fully aware of the significant contributions made by the district superintendents and district secretaries of missions, without whose cooperation no real measure of success could be realized. No board can long serve effectively without the full support and cooperation of the laymen and ministers in the local churches. We express gratitude to each who has taken the challenge of missions seriously.

We commend, and are grateful to, Mrs. H. C. Turlington and the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Woman's Society of Christian Service for the enthusiastic promotion of the gigantic missionary challenge which confronts our Christian conscience today.

We earnestly solicit the full support of every local church in the total program of missions.

World Missions

WORLD SERVICE: In a world whose need and cry for the Christian gospel in all of its ramifications is being heard everywhere, we recognize the need for the increased "Askings" for World Service. We recommend that each charge accept the increase in order to meet the challenge and maintain a continuing and progressive missionary program. By so doing, we shall thereby enable our General Board of Missions to expand the work in scope and effectiveness as we all answer the call of the Great Commission. We respectfully urge the Annual Conference Commission on Finance to give consideration to the possibility of accepting fully the "Askings" of the General Board in matters of World Service.

MISSIONARY MONTH: Observed in January with a Missionary Rally in each district. Every phase of the missionary program of the church was presented at these rallies. Dr. P. Gordan Gould of the National Board of Missions in Philadelphia was the inspirational speaker in the following districts: Durham, Raleigh, Fayetteville, and Goldsboro. Dr. J. Lem Stokes, president of Pfeiffer College, was the inspirational speaker in the New Bern, Rocky Mount, Elizabeth City, Wilmington, and Burlington Districts. Reverend O. L. Hathaway, executive secretary of the North Carolina Board of Missions, and Reverend J. W. Page, Conference missionary secretary, presented the various conference projects and causes of missionary concern. The several district superintendents and district missionary secretaries gave excellent publicity and guidance for the missionary rallies. The laymen of each district were presented the challenge of the entire missionary program of the Methodist Church: World Service, World Missions—National and Foreign, Church Extension, Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief, and the quadrennial concern of the church in the four lanes of decision.

We urge each local church to send its chairman of the Commission on Missions to this conference. Our youth are encouraged to attend the “Youth and Missions Conference” which is in connection with the Missionary Conference.

YOUTH CARAVAN: Each year the North Carolina Annual Conference has made a lasting and significant contribution to the “Witnessing Mission of the Church” by sending our choice youth under the leadership of capable and consecrated counselors, to Europe on the Youth Caravan. At this hour such a group, under the guidance of the Reverend J. W. Page and Mrs. Page, is enlarging and continuing this witness. We call the churches of the Conference to continual prayer on behalf of this significant work. We recommend the continuance of this European Caravan to the end that we shall further the cause of the Kingdom of God abroad.

It is the desire of your Annual Conference Board of Missions that each missionary from our Conference shall be financially supported by a local church or churches within the conference of the individual missionary. (Example: “Paul Bunn Mission Work Fund,” etc.) Every church is urged to make some contribution to this project through “Mission Specials.” We call upon the conference, through individual ministers and

local churches, to give support by means of interest, prayers, promotion, and money to all the missionaries from our conference.

MCOR (METHODIST COMMITTEE ON OVERSEAS RELIEF): Recognizing this to be the "emergency mission special" of the church, renewed emphasis must be placed on this avenue of our Christian witness. This is our opportunity to render significant assistance in the catastrophic areas of the world. We urge each church to support to the fullest this cause of emergency relief in the name of our Saviour.

ADVANCE SPECIALS: Our Advance Special Program includes the following causes: Lands of Decision (Argentina, The Chinese in Dispersion, Pakistan, Rhodesia); all new Methodist churches (organized since 1932), including parsonages of these churches, proposed sites for new churches; tuition scholarships for directors of Christian education; the Methodist Student Center at East Carolina College; Alaska Methodist College; Bethany Mission on Shiloh Charge, Rocky Mount District; Conference missionaries in other lands; Caravan Methodist Church in Linz, Austria; work of Methodism in European area; Soo Chou University of Hong Kong; Sunset Park Methodist Church, Wilmington; the Paul Bunn Mission Work Fund; Foreign student fund to assist students to study in Methodist colleges in North Carolina; Wesley Foundation, North Carolina College; Galilee-Laurinburg (C.J.); St. John-Wilmington (C.J.); John Wesley-Fayetteville (C.J.).

HOME MISSIONS

Church Extension

In the conference year work has continued in the area of extension with new buildings and new sites being developed in every district. The Board is facing population explosion in our state in a realistic manner and attempting to keep pace with community development.

During the last year our conference has started three new churches as follows: Cokesbury, Raleigh; St. Luke, Burlington; Pine Valley, Wilmington.

\$10.00 Club

Due to the continued generosity of the members of the \$10 Club, during the conference year to May 1, 1961, the board has been able to make available \$56,701.02 for new church construction. Wynnewood Park in Raleigh received \$15,000; Wellons Village in Durham received \$15,000. Other churches approved subject to beginning construction are Old Hundred (\$5,000); St. James, Raleigh (\$15,000); New Hope, Goldsboro (\$15,000). Approved by the Board for assistance in July and November 1961 are: Glendale Heights, Durham, for \$15,000, and Northwoods Methodist, Jacksonville, for \$15,000. This will bring to 48 the number of new churches made possible through the \$10.00 Club efforts.

The continuation of this important program is contingent upon the combined efforts of our pastors and laymen in encouraging an increased membership to support the cause. We urge both pastors and laymen to encourage participation in this program.

New Congregations and Sites

A site for the new Cokesbury congregation on Poole Road, Raleigh, North Carolina, has been purchased at \$10,000.

Other locations in growing communities are receiving our attention and we hope to be able to secure good sites for new churches.

The Cokesbury Methodist Church of the Raleigh District was organized on October 2, 1960.

The St. Luke Methodist Church, Burlington District, was organized February 12, 1961.

A pastor was assigned to the Pine Valley Section of Wilmington, North Carolina, February 1, 1961.

Parsonages

We have helped eleven churches in the amount of \$11,283.56.

When You Build

In order to make a request for a donation from the Board of Missions, the pastor or some official of the church must secure an application blank from the executive secretary, Reverend O. L. Hathaway, 3341 Hampton Road, Raleigh, N. C. This application for aid must be completed and in the hands of the executive secretary not later than May 1, annually. The applications are then processed and donations granted at the time of annual conference. The funds granted on these applications will be available to churches, parsonages, or other building causes within the ensuing conference year.

We recommend that each church follow the rules of the *Discipline of the Church* (1960) and the laws of the state in all of its building programs. Any building to cost as much as \$10,000 must have the approval of the commissioner of insurance and plans for any building to cost as much as \$20,000 should be drawn by a competent licensed architect. We recommend that all plans be presented to the District Board of Church Location and Building, to the Conference Board of Missions (if aid is requested) and to the National Board of Missions, Board of Architecture, for review and improvement if needed.

Alaska Methodist College

This is one of our National Missions Specials and one of the most worthy of our projects. We urge every church to continue its support of this project.

Pastors' School

The Board of Missions submits the following as members of the Pastors' School Board of Managers: Rev. J. W. Lineberger and Mr. C. H. Chewning, term to expire in 1963; Rev. L. C. Vereen and Mrs. George Ratterman, terms to expire in 1965; Rev. C. P. Wommack and Rev. C. S. Boggs, terms to expire in 1967.

II

THE BOARD OF MISSIONS, INC.

The Board of Missions, North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church, Incorporated, was chartered by the North Carolina Annual Conference to facilitate the expansion of church extension within the bounds of our conference.

The Board has secured a loan of \$250,000 to enable us to help our churches to expand their work by making it possible for them to secure loans.

We recommend the re-election of all officers of this board for the ensuing year, and we encourage the support of the conference that this agency of church extension may grow in its service.

III

REPORT OF THE SURVEY, RESEARCH, AND PLANNING COMMITTEE

The Survey, Research, and Planning Committee has continued its survey of the districts during the present conference year. The sum of \$5,000 has been provided by Ormond Fund of the Duke University Divinity School to continue this project. The "Production Story" for the following districts has been completed: Durham, Burlington, Goldsboro, Elizabeth City, New Bern, and Wilmington, leaving only the Rocky Mount District to be completed. The Raleigh and Fayetteville Districts were completed last year. Reverend M. R. Chambers has been employed to do this work. A further study entitled "Look at the People" is in process and a field study of the Raleigh and Fayetteville Districts will be completed by the Annual Conference session.

REPORT OF NORTH CAROLINA PASTORS' SCHOOL

The North Carolina Pastors' School, together with the Christian Convocation and the James A. Gray Lectures, was held October 24-26, 1960, at Duke University. In-

creased attendance and participation confirmed the value of the new fall schedule established the preceding year. An innovation was the series of divinity school class reunions held at this time instead of commencement time.

The Gray lecturer was Professor Jaroslav A. Pelikan of the University of Chicago Divinity School. Bishop Richard C. Raines of the Indianapolis Area was Convocation preacher. Dr. A. Dudley Ward of the Methodist Board of Christian Social Concerns and Professor Egil Grislis of Duke Divinity School were special lecturers. Another successful innovation was the first Alumni Lecture, delivered by Dr. Finis A. Crutchfield of Boston Avenue Methodist Church, Tulsa.

Other leaders included Dean Robert E. Cushman, chairman of the Convocation; Professor James T. Cleland, chairman of the Gray Lectures; Dr. Wilson O. Weldon of Charlotte, chairman of the Board of Managers; and the Reverend A. C. Waggoner of High Point, Alumni president. Services of worship were led by Professor W. A. Kale, Dr. Cleland, Chaplain Howard C. Wilkinson, the Reverend Harmon L. Smith, and the divinity school choir.

The 1961 session, scheduled for October 30-November 1, will include divinity school reunions for the classes of '37, '52, and '55-'56-'57, together with a general alumni luncheon. Speakers are Professor Albert C. Outler of Perkins School of Theology, Gray lecturer; Bishop John Wesley Lord of the Washington Area, Convocation preacher; Dr. Jesse H. Ziegler of the American Association of Theological Schools, and Professor Frank Baker of Duke University, special lecturers; and the Reverend Leon Russell, First Methodist Church, Rocky Mount, Alumni lecturer. The Reverend Harmon L. Smith will again serve as assistant director.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PARSONAGE STANDARDS

With a deep sense of gratitude and sincere appreciation for all of our parsonages, the Committee on Parsonage Standards recommends that a brochure entitled "A Guide for Building, Furnishing, and Upkeep of Parsonages in the North Carolina Conference" be published, and that a copy be distributed to each pastor and each church in the conference.

The committee further recommends that the brochure contain the following information:

The **Discipline**, paragraph 145.7, provides that the Quarterly Conference elect a Parsonage Committee, "which, with the approval of the trustees, shall provide an adequate and comfortable residence for the pastor and maintain the upkeep and furnishing of same."

Whenever a new parsonage is built, its many uses should be considered. Although no standard plans should be used for all parsonages, since needs vary according to communities, there are some general rules which should be used and constitute a minimum standard.

Locating and Building a Parsonage

Paragraph 180 of the **Discipline** details explicitly the procedure for building a parsonage. In part it states that the pastor and district superintendent shall give their written consent to build or purchase a parsonage; that the District Board of Church Location and Building shall approve the proposed site, and that a "statement of the need for the proposed facilities, and the sketches, estimates, and plans" shall be submitted to this Board for consideration and approval. It is very important that strict attention be given to the instructions in paragraph 174 concerning the inclusion of the Trust Clause.

It is thought best that the parsonage be located near, but not necessarily next door to, the church. If it is in town, it should be in a satisfactory neighborhood; if a circuit parsonage, as conveniently and favorably located as possible, considering expected future growth and division. At least one person from each church should be appointed to the Building Committee.

It is recommended that the services of a contractor or competent builder be secured; that various floor plans and outside designs be studied with the view of determining what would be best suited to the needs of the local situation; that all rooms, where practicable, be on one floor; and that the construction be of brick veneer.

House Arrangement and Equipment

Bedrooms: A minimum of three (four are preferable), with ample closet space in each.

Bathrooms: Two; in a two-story house, 2, with at least one bedroom and one bathroom on the first floor.

Kitchen: Built-in cabinets, sink, hot and cold running water, and large enough for family eating space, or a breakfast nook.

Living Room: Large enough for necessary parsonage entertaining.

Dining Room: Because of the necessary entertaining a dining room is desirable. Where there is no dining room, the dining area should adjoin the living room in order to give ample space for large groups.

Study: On the first floor away from the family activities, with a separate outside entrance in or near the front of the house, and suitably equipped.

Den or Family Room: Very desirable; situated away from main living room and study.

Garage or Carport: With a finished storage room (if storage facilities are not provided elsewhere). If a garage connected to the house, heat ducts may be included to provide play and recreational area.

Screens: In all windows and outside doors.

Wiring and Plumbing: Consider providing for present and future needs, in order that stove, refrigerator, washing machine, clothes dryer, automatic furnace, water pump (if necessary), hot water heater, air-conditioning units, etc., may be used.

Telephones: Private line, if possible. An extension in the study and one on the second floor.

TV Antenna: Preferably on a pole to protect the roof of the house.

Furnishings

Church should provide: All heavy furnishings, including electric or gas cooking range, automatic refrigerator with a large freezer top (or a separate freezer), automatic hot water heater, washing machine, and clothes dryer (or connections for same); bedroom, dining room, and living suites; good mattresses; floor coverings, shades or blinds, curtains or drapes, in all rooms; some floor and table lamps, and occasional tables.

Minister should provide: Linens, blankets, pillows, dishes, china, crystal, silverware, cooking utensils, baby beds, radio, TV, pictures, and other personal items which he desires.

Grounds

Parsonage grounds should have foundation shrubbery, shade trees, adequate yard space for children, paved driveway and walks, and a power mower where there is a large lawn.

Insurance

Fire and extended coverage in an amount equal to at least three-fourths of the replacement value of the parsonage and furnishings should be carried by the church. The minister is urged to carry adequate insurance to cover the furnishings belonging to him.

Repairs

Each charge should determine the amount to be set aside each year, or included in the budget, for repairs and maintenance. An amount equal to 2% of the parsonage value is suggested to be set aside each year to accumulate for large repairs. The house should be kept well painted inside and out, and should be checked periodically for pest control.

Renovation of Sub-Standard Parsonages

All sub-standard parsonages should be renovated to conform, as near as possible, to the above minimum standards.

General Suggestions

Pets should be kept in their proper places so that no damage is done to the parsonage property. Any damage is the responsibility of the minister.

Discarded furnishings from members should not be placed in the parsonage. When a gift of furniture or furnishings is made, designate if the gift is for the minister's family or for the parsonage.

When a minister moves, the Parsonage Committee should see that the lights, telephone, and water are left connected, taking care of a deposit for public utilities. It is desirable to maintain a list of the furnishings and equipment in the parsonage.

It is recommended that each minister prepare and leave a "Parsonage Book" (or continue a previous one) in which he places all guarantees, repair parts lists, and instructions for use of equipment belonging to the parsonage. He should also indicate

when and from whom purchased, and whom to call for service. This book may well also contain a list of whom to call for various reasons, where to find various items, when and by whom various improvements were made, and any other information helpful to an incoming minister.

Ordinarily, the congregation likes to see the parsonage; therefore, it is suggested that "Open House" be observed occasionally.

The slogan of the North Carolina ministers' wives is "Leave every parsonage better than we find it." It is hoped that each minister's family will seek to maintain this goal.

† REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PENSIONS

I

During the session of Annual Conference in June 1960, your Board of Pensions was requested to report to the 1961 Conference recommendations as to the policy to be followed in use of the funds provided for the support of superannuates. After thorough and prayerful consideration and study, your Board presents two proposals and recommends them for adoption by the Conference. It is to be understood that these proposals are in addition to the policies already operating in the Conference.

First, a Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program for Retired Ministers and their Dependents. (Dependents are defined as wife and unmarried children from birth to 19 years of age. Benefits are also provided for unmarried dependent children ages 19-23.)

This program is sponsored by the General Board of Pensions and underwritten by the Travelers Insurance Company of Hartford, Connecticut.

I. The Special Benefits Plan provides up to \$2,500.00 during the lifetime of each person insured.

II. Plan covers hospital and surgical expenses.

III. HOW IT WORKS—When benefits start:

a. The insured individual pays an initial deductible of \$25.00 for each separate accident or sickness.

b. Then the plan pays 75% of all additional covered hospital and surgical expenses up to the maximum of \$2,500.00.

c. Exclusions are: Dental work, eye glasses, hearing aids (unless due to accident), occupational accidents or sickness for lay personnel and ministers eligible for workman's compensation, injuries as result of war and charges in government hospitals.

IV. COST: All premiums are due to be paid from the funds of the Conference Board of Pensions.

Retired ministers—\$7.75 per month; dependents, \$8.25 per month. Widows, \$7.75 per month; dependents, \$2.50 per month.

A representative of the General Board of Pensions and a person from the Traveler's Insurance Company will be present at Conference to explain details of the program and answer questions.

II

We call attention to the fact that recent changes in the Social Security Act have occurred which extend the time for election for Social Security to April 15, 1962. Every minister, including Retired and Approved Supply Ministers, with an annual income of \$400.00 or more (some part of which is from the ministry) is urged to look into this. Consult your District Director of Internal Revenue or your Social Security District

†Part Second of Section I of the original Report was deleted. W. L. Clegg moved the appointment of a committee by the Bishop to study a Conference Group Insurance Plan. Office. Ask about a new pamphlet, "Dear Mr. Clergyman." This may greatly affect you and your future.

We strongly recommend that the Conference continue the policy of handling the funds of the Board of Pensions through the Methodist Foundation, Inc. We are convinced that commingling of funds is very beneficial to all concerned. This policy is also in keeping with the policy of the General Board of Pensions.

III

For the support of the Conference claimants during the Conference year 1961-'62, we recommend an apportionment on the churches of 16% of the salaries of the preachers. We also recommend the annuity rate of \$54.00 per service year for Retired Preachers, including Retired Supply Preachers who meet the Disciplinary requirement for annuity claim.

A list of the Conference claimants and their records of service years and annuity will appear in the Conference Journal. We recommend Special Appropriations as follows: Nannie Pattishall \$378.00 and Mrs. J. W. Smith \$600.00.

The Conference Claimants who have died during the year are: A. S. Barnes, J. W. Bradley, Mrs. R. E. Atkinson.

The Board recommends an honorarium for the secretary of \$300.00 plus expenses.

We recommend that a district superintendent, as a representative from the Bishop's Cabinet, be added to the Sustentation Fund Committee. We feel that this would be a great asset to the committee in making decisions relative to ministers who are referred to it by the cabinet or a district superintendent.

*REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON PROMOTION AND CULTIVATION

The Commission on Promotion and Cultivation recognizes as its purpose the promoting of World Service and Conference Benevolences in the local church. This purpose can be achieved only through a program which will help the local church better understand the financial needs of the Methodist Church.

During the year we have joined with the Commission on Promotion and Cultivation of the Western North Carolina Conference in purchasing the back page of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* to promote several special offerings and to present World Service information.

We have purchased three sets of the new World Service filmstrips and one copy of the film, "World Behind the Headlines," for the Conference film library.

Plans are progressing on the production of a filmstrip which will place particular emphasis on promoting World Service and Conference Benevolences in the local churches of our Conference.

It is the opinion of this Commission that there is not a clear understanding of the Conference financial structure by the ministers and laymen of our Conference. Therefore, we recommend that during the 1961-1962 conference year there be conducted on district levels meetings for the study of the conference financial structure with emphasis placed on Conference Benevolences and World Service.

Whereas Paragraph 740 of the 1960 *Discipline* states:

"The World Service Fund is basic in the financial program of the Methodist Church. World Service on apportionment represents the minimum needs of the general agencies of the church. Payment in full of these apportionments by local churches and annual conferences is the first benevolent responsibility of the Church."

And whereas Paragraph 795 of the 1960 *Discipline* states:

"The Commission (on World Service and Finance) on receiving from the treasurer of the Council on World Service and Finance a statement of the amount apportioned the Annual Conference for World Service, shall combine the World Service apportionment and the approved Conference Benevolence budget in one total sum to be known as World Service and Conference Benevolences."

Therefore, the Commission on Promotion and Cultivation recommends that the North Carolina Annual Conference assume immediately the full World Service apportionments of the 1960-1964 quadrennium.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION

(North Carolina Christian Advocate)

Under the able leadership of the Reverend S. J. Starnes as editor-manager, we are happy to report that the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* and the Piedmont Press are enjoying the kind of support that enables them to render a worthwhile service.

The editor has been delighted with the gracious manner in which the *Advocate* has been supported this year. Bishops, district superintendents, pastors, and laymen have all been very encouraging. Some have told him they feel it is now serving the two Conferences better than ever. We feel that with the continued support of the preachers, district superintendents, bishops, laymen, we will continue to improve our condition and operate successfully.

We have of necessity had to make some adjustments in the matter of overhead ex-

penses. We have been able to effect a saving of some \$19,000 per year in this connection, which seems to just about offset the loss reported last year. Our present *Advocate* subscription list is around 15,000, and this is an increase of 3,500 to 4,000 for the present year. Around 1,500 of these, of course, are complimentary to pastors, missionaries, widows, etc.

Advocate income for the year ending March 31 amounted to \$59,686.18. In this amount is included \$6,000.00 received from the North Carolina Conference. (The \$6,000.00 from the Western North Carolina Conference was received after March 31.) Fourteen thousand, four hundred dollars was received from Piedmont Press for rent. By eliminating these two last figures we come up with an income of \$39,286.18. Expenses for the year amounted to \$22,528.93 for all expenses and \$42,139.36 charged by Piedmont Press for printing the *Advocate*, giving us a total of \$64,668.29. This gives us a loss for the *Advocate* of \$4,982.11, considering all income.

The term of W. B. Hall of High Point expires this year, and we respectfully request his re-election by the Western North Carolina Conference.

The term of A. J. Hobbs of New Bern expires this year, and we respectfully request his re-election by the North Carolina Conference.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS

In accordance with the 1960 General Conference action authorizing such a committee in each conference, the North Carolina Conference Committee on Publishing Interests has been established. It consists of members at large and district secretaries for each of the districts.

The specific duties of this committee are:

1. To encourage the reading of good literature throughout the conference, especially those books and publications of our Methodist Publishing House.
2. To promote and develop a church library program in each local church, supported and maintained by a Good Literature Committee in each local church.
3. To cooperate fully with the Methodist Publishing House in such matters as presentation of the Publishing House check for Conference claimants; promotion of the all-family plan for Methodism's monthly family magazine, *Together*; the promotion and sale of the bi-weekly publication: *Christian Advocate* and the quarterly publication for the Christian scholar: *Religion in Life*; and the magazine for the music of the church and church school: *Music Ministry*.
4. To work closely with related agencies such as the Commission on Promotion and Cultivation; the Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information; TRAFCO; and agents of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*.

Initial steps have been taken to perform these duties. However, due to limited funds available to the Commission on World Service and Finance, this commission voted no funds for these activities. Hence, any real achievement of our objectives will have to wait that future date when such money is available. In the meantime, close liaison with the Methodist Publishing House will be maintained and an annual meeting for all members will be held each year during the Annual Conference at a time and place to be announced each year.

REPORT OF THE INTERCONFERENCE COMMISSION ON COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY RELIGIOUS WORK

The Interconference Commission on College and University Religious Work has a new name! Before this quadrennium, it was referred to as the Interconference Commission on Student Religious Work. Now, however, it is felt that there is more to the ministry on the campus than just ministering to the students, for often, the faculty members and staff also are recipients of our ministry.

Let us examine this initial word of our title, Interconference. When the General Conference of The Methodist Church delegates to the annual conferences its ministry to campuses, it requests that wherever there is more than one annual conference operating in a given state or similar region that the boards of education of the annual conferences appoint representatives to form an Interconference Commission. Hence, in North Carolina we now have an Interconference Commission composed of representatives of the three annual conferences of Methodism in this state; namely, the North Carolina Conference and the Western North Carolina Conference both of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, and the North Carolina Conference of the Central Jurisdiction. There is an executive committee representing persons of all of the three conferences, and the three elected officers happen to come in this case from each of the three conferences.

Our ministry to the more than 16,000 Methodists who are studying in the nearly 60 colleges and junior colleges of North Carolina is a tremendous task.

The three annual conferences of Methodism in North Carolina invest some \$57,000 in program funds to carry on this ministry. In addition, they invest thousands of dollars for the extension of physical facilities.

The Interconference Commission has no money of its own. Rather, the task is to examine the needs of the Methodist ministry to campuses throughout the state and to present these needs to the annual conferences. This is done through appearing before the commissions on World Service and Finance. After the World Service commissions have made their recommendations and these have gone through the annual conference business sessions, then the amounts of money which are allocated to the various campuses are sent through the Interconference Commission. It is the task of the Interconference Commission to, as conscientiously as possible, allocate funds to the various causes. In all three conferences, these funds are collected during one conference year and spent during the following conference year. Hence, we know at the first of each year, the amount of money that will be available during that year.

At present, a dozen places receive money through the Interconference Commission. This money is allocated on a basis of need and opportunity of meeting the need. Often the number of Methodist students enrolled in a given institution will greatly influence the allocation of funds to that institution. Hence, the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill with the largest Methodist enrollment of any school in the state receives more money through the Interconference Commission than does any other school. Duke University, with many Methodist students, receives for the work of the Methodist Student Fellowship the next largest amount of money. North Carolina State College in Raleigh receives a considerable amount. Others receiving funds from the Interconference Commission include the Wesley Foundations at Woman's College, East Carolina College, Appalachian State Teachers College, Western Carolina College, the Wesley Foundation at Winston-Salem serving several institutions, the Wesley Foundation at A&T College, the Wesley Foundation at North Carolina College, the Methodist Student Fellowship at Davidson College, the Wesley Fellowship at Pembroke State College, and the office of the State Director of the Methodist Student Movement of North Carolina, among whose tasks are the correlation and extension of the Methodist Student Movement.

The tenor of the times has changed in the past two decades. Few college students today consider their college years as a vacation. "From the tables down at Maury's to to the place where Louie dwells" you will find serious-minded students discussing serious subjects. They are concerned about literature and drama. It bothers them that the Church has made such a feeble witness on social concerns. They take themselves quite seriously. Babies born in a hot war and reared during cold wars can hardly be expected to be jovial when they are in their upper adolescent years.

Times on college campuses have changed in other ways, too. At the last meeting of the Interconference Commission nearly every campus reporting referred to theirs as a "suitcase college," stating that the students just are not there on weekends. Hence, much of the organized ministry to students is carried on during the week in small, informal study group sessions. Usually there are from six to twelve in number of participants. Occasionally, more than one group will be meeting at a time. Sometimes the groups are intercollegiate.

In the student religious groups on campuses the Christian inter-racial witness is passing into the state of a non-racial experience—a state in which race just is not a factor to be considered.

Students on campuses today are interested in theology. It is not uncommon to hear even freshmen using the theological terms of Tillich, Niebuhr, Barth, and Kierkegaard. Even more common is talk of the judgment as brought out in the writings of Jean-Paul Sartre, William Faulkner, or Tennessee Williams.

When someone goes as a minister to Methodists on a campus, he must meet certain qualifications. We cannot just send a supply pastor or an untrained person to do this work. If we did, we would lose our accreditation, for in order to have an accredited Wesley Foundation, we must have as a director a man who has a Bachelor of Divinity degree, or at least a Master of Arts degree with some training in theology. Other qualifications are necessary also. Increasingly, the academic standing of the ministers to students must go up. Among some of the leaders there is the feeling that a qualified Wesley Foundation Director should have a Ph.D. degree in addition to his Bachelor of Divinity degree and his Bachelor of Arts degree. However, many of us feel that just as necessary as this is the concept of the minister as a pastor. He needs pastoral experience and the knowledge of what the ministry to a local community "back home" is like.

In spite of these high academic qualifications, it may be that our work logically should be considered a part of the Board of Missions, for in a sense when we send a minister to campus, we are sending him as a missionary to that campus. In many ways, it is a pagan atmosphere, infested with the materialism of our time.

In spite of the high demands made upon ministers to students to be ministers, to be persons of spiritual worth, pastoral experience, and academic training, sometimes these ministers are sent to campuses with no minimum salary beneath them. A man with a family may be paid as low as \$4,000 per year out of which he must pay his own rent, with no furnished parsonage or traveling expenses.

Our ministers to students feel this. They sometimes feel that they are set apart and not considered as really ministers. Yet, they are working on the strategic frontiers of our Church; The Student Movement is the "cutting edge" of the Church.

Short tenures have hurt terribly in the ministry to students. On one university campus in the state there were four different Wesley Foundation directors serving in a three year period. Low salaries and the sensing that one's efforts are not really appreciated have helped to create the frustrating circumstances that have resulted in such short tenures. To minister to students in the seeking years, we can no longer send persons who want to be post-graduates at college in order to continue to receive the protection of the "ivory towers" for a few more years; nor can we send pastors who have been frustrated by the pressures of a powerful hierarchy from one side and the pettiness of people from the other. Instead, we must send our best qualified ministers into these strategic situations.

Many of the 4,000 Methodists now studying at the three branches of the Greater University of North Carolina will undoubtedly be among the top leaders of our state and nation in a few years. Can we continue to neglect so great an opportunity?

Many Methodist students are anxious to be a part of the Church. They are just as anxious that the Church be revived in the fire of our times, that she no longer dabble in mud holes, but get out into the depths and deal with the vital issues of the day.

One of the evidences that students are anxious to take their proper place in the Church is that student representatives properly selected to be members of the Conference Board of Education, the Interconference Commission, the Board of Missions, the Commission on Christian Vocations, and the Board of Christian Concerns often ask their counselors: "When are we going to have a meeting of the Conference Board?" adding, "I want to be a part of it!" One of the things that denominational leaders can do to aid in the ministry to students is to make sure that student members of boards and agencies are adequately notified of meetings and that their responsibilities are made clear. Since even on quadrennial boards and agencies student membership changes annually, more than ordinary care should be exercised to see that student members are notified promptly.

Secretaries of Student Work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service have been most helpful by sending the "Blue Cards" to the campuses early. This has especially helped the ministers on the state-related campuses, where one's religious preference is not always requested on registration forms.

A part of our ministry is the Methodist Student Movement of North Carolina. It sponsors such efforts to improve international understanding as a United Nations Model Assembly, in which as realistic a situation as possible is simulated. Persons of different religious and national backgrounds and of varying views are invited.

In all meetings an ecumenical approach is employed. Full fellowship is maintained at all of the intercollegiate meetings of the Methodist Student Movement of North Carolina. No Methodist of any color, culture, or country is ever excluded or made to feel inferior by forced segregation. Rather, the Student Movement in both policy and practice considers it an evangelistic opportunity to urge, not just permit, the participation of all in sacred worship, study, the social side, and service opportunities.

This is Methodism in her ministry to campus communities striving to become intellectually respectable, socially inclusive, and spiritually sound.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUSTENTATION FUND

Ministers' Emergency Relief Fund

1. The Emergency Relief Fund Committee shall be composed of one representative from each of the following Boards or Committees: Board of Pensions, Committee on Conference Relations, Board of Hospitals and Homes, and a representative from the Cabinet. This Committee shall make all decisions as to approval of grants after a thorough investigation of a case in point upon application presented by the disabled minister's District Superintendent.

2. The Emergency Fund appropriation shall be used for emergency grants to effective ministers, and approved supply pastors serving an appointment, who become disabled during their active ministry and are unable to continue work during the period of disability, and whose income during this period is not adequate to meet emergency needs. Maximum aid shall not exceed \$4,000 per Conference year.

3. Aid shall be granted for the period of disability within the Conference year in which the grant is made. At the end of the Conference year, or period of disability, if further aid is needed, reconsideration shall be given to the case.

4. Appropriate application forms shall be placed in the hands of the District Superintendents. Authorization forms to be submitted to the Conference Treasurer shall be in the hands of the Committee.

5. We recommend that the Ministers' Emergency Relief Fund be continued as an appropriation equal to 1 percent of the pastor's salary in connection with the Ministers' Retirement Fund.

6. The following ministers received aid from the fund this year: The Reverend Wesley Noble, the Reverend Stanley S. Snead, the Reverend H. L. Davis, and the Reverend Richard Braunstein, deceased.

REPORT OF THE TELEVISION RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION

1. The Television Radio and Film Commission held a successful 2 day audio-visual workshop in Raleigh on Nov. 21-22, 1960, which was attended by at least one person from every district. In view of this interest we are preparing for three one-day workshops at strategic points on April 30, May 1, and 2, 1962. These workshops will embrace three districts each in order to make our services more available to the men of the conference. The district groupings will be as follows: Elizabeth City, New Bern, Rocky Mount, April 30; Wilmington, Goldsboro, Fayetteville, May 1, and Raleigh, Durham, Burlington, May 2.

2. The Walton Memorial Library continues to grow with the ever-increasing demand for audio-visual material. During the conference year there has been over 2,000 calls for films and filmstrips for use in the local church. A recent supplement to our 1959 catalog brings our library facilities to the ready attention of our users. Many new filmstrip series have been purchased as memorial gifts from individuals. Gifts and memorials to the Walton Memorial Audio-Visual Library should be sent to Mrs. Pat Lawson, Jr., 2328 Derby Drive, Raleigh, N. C. The Commission encourages the practice of Memorial giving and will indicate memorial gifts by appropriate markings in the next catalog.

3. In the field of Television and Radio, the following recommendations are made:

a. In view of the impact on the listening, viewing audience, pastors are urged to make special preparations when on radio or television. A greater service can be rendered to Christ and His Church when careful preparation has been made. We must become more and more aware of the danger and damage that may be done by lack of preparation.

b. There is now under production a 13 week Children's T. V. series. Being aware of the influence of T. V. on our children we urge every pastor to take a few moments to elaborate on the children's T. V. series on T. V. Sunday, January 7, 1962. We strongly recommend that the appeal be made toward the goal of 10 cents per member in all of our churches. This will enable us to extend the 13 week series into a 26 week series or even longer. The average giving in overall Methodism to this cause is only slightly over one cent per member.

4. The Commission is alert to the full conference program and attempts to make available the Audio-Visual aids needed to enhance the ever-demanding program of our conference.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

Report No. 1

Citation of Gurney P. Hood: Statesmanlike Church Leader

Gurney Pope Hood was born in Wayne County, North Carolina, on November 26, 1884. His parents were farmers.

His education was in the public schools of Wayne County, in a night business school, and by private teachers. On August 31, 1908, he was licensed as an attorney-at-law by the State of North Carolina.

Mr. Hood married Marion Lee Stevens of Goldsboro on June 16, 1915, and together they reared a fine family (three sons). Mrs. Hood has constantly encouraged her husband in his numerous church and civic endeavors. She, also, has long been an able church and civic leader.

His civic services include: alderman, City of Goldsboro (1911-1913); mayor of Morehead City (1917-1919); member of North Carolina House of Representatives, from Wayne County (1929-1931); chairman of subcommittee of finance committee of House of Representatives, which wrote the Local Government Commission Act (1931); chairman of a committee of State employees (other than teachers), which wrote the State Retirement Act (1939-1941); and State Commissioner of Banks (1931-1951).

Governor W. Kerr Scott led the State in voting favorably on a \$200 million bond issue proposal, for financing the paving of secondary roads (referendum on June 4, 1949). Mr. Hood rendered significant assistance in the bond issue campaign. ". . . He came out with a set of statistics about the State's economic condition, made some comparisons of these with similar statistics at the time the State made its original big road investment, and pronounced the proposal sound and statesmanly. This helped mightily . . ." (Capus Waynick, editor, *North Carolina Roads and Their Builders*, 1952, p. 54). The paving of secondary roads has laid a foundation for a new era of rural church progress, and sequentially, urban church progress.

Mr. Hood has long been prominently identified with endeavors concerned with increasing racial good will. He is a member of the Board of Trustees of Shaw University (Negro), member of executive committee, chairman of finance committee, and chairman of a committee engaged in raising funds for debt retirement and expansion. He was a member of the Board of Directors of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, in 1948-1951.

On February 1, 1961, a citation was presented, which reads: "The North Carolina Council of Churches proudly presents this citation of merit to Mr. and Mrs. Gurney P. Hood for distinguished service through the years in the cause of ecumenical Christianity."

Mr. Hood began his work with the North Carolina Annual Conference, as Conference Lay Leader (1919-1920). In 1931, he was made a member of the Commission on Budget which is now named Commission on World Service and Finance. He served as president of this Commission from 1944 to 1956.

The Annual Conference is experiencing a remarkable renaissance of life and work, under the leadership of Bishop Paul N. Garber. To this renaissance, Mr. Hood has constantly contributed strong leadership, financially and otherwise. He has assisted the enterprises of evangelism, church extension, and rural church work. He helped lead the Annual Conference in attaining the much needed \$3,300-3,600-4,000 minimum salary scale for pastors (full-time). He helped in establishing The Methodist Retirement Home, and in founding the two new colleges. He is vice-chairman of the building committee for The Methodist Building (Conference Headquarters), now being constructed. Other leadership contributions to the renaissance are numerous.

In 1955, the Methodist Foundation, Inc. (originally Methodist Fund, Inc.) was chartered. This magnificently conceived and well-managed agency of the Annual Conference was initiated by the Commission on World Service and Finance, while Mr. Hood was president of the Commission. He is president of Methodist Foundation, Inc., having served as such since its inception. Providentially, the Foundation has come into existence

to help financially undergird the expanding work of the Annual Conference, which work is without parallel in American Methodism. Mr. Hood originated The Rural Church Fund which, through the Commission on Town and Country Work, is a participating part of Methodist Foundation, Inc.

Mr. Hood served as a delegate to the General Conferences of 1938 (M. E. Church, South), 1940, 1944, and 1948, to the Uniting Conference of 1939, and to the Jurisdictional Conferences of 1940, 1944, 1948, 1952, and 1960.

The North Carolina Annual Conference, Se. J., The Methodist Church, meeting in Durham, N. C., presents this citation of Mr. Gurney P. Hood, with gratitude for his multifaceted constructive services. His irrepressible progressiveness is prompted by vision, without which "the people perish." He may be truly characterized as possessing spiritual nobility. He practices the Protestant principle of the priesthood of all believers, particularly with respect to all believers being ministers (servants).

Report No. 2

Progress of Field Work

Orientation Workshop for New Pastors.

N. C. Rural Church Committee of the State Council of Churches.

Appreciation is expressed for the services of Mr. Charles B. Clapp and Mr. Richard E. Northrup, Duke Divinity Students, who under the support of the Ormond Fund of the Duke Divinity School have rendered valuable service in the field contacts relating to the District Survey and Analysis Inventory. It is hoped by Annual Conference that assimilation of this information from two of our districts will have been completed.

The field work of the commission continues to be a great challenge to us. Much yet needs to be done if we are to serve as model agents for a progressive rural church program. As the work grows in magnitude may it also grow in Grace. For He who has been our help in the past is still our hope in time to come.

Report No. 3

Long-Range Planning and Leadership Training

I

The North Carolina Annual Conference area is "frontier again" as to economic expansion, population growth, and sociological development. The fact of "frontier again" gives The Methodist Church increasing opportunity and responsibility.

II

Proper growth of the Annual Conference requires knowledge, planning, skill, and work. An Annual Conference (over-all) planning agency is greatly needed. The work would be similar to that of a city planning agency. Well-trained personnel and adequate facilities would be essential.

Across the North Carolina Annual Conference area, there is constant, and in many cases rapid, local community change. The need exists for an Annual Conference agency (counterpart of over-all planning agency) which would provide a service of local church and community analysis, and counseling on long-range planning for the local church. Well-trained personnel and adequate facilities would be essential.

III

Proper growth of the Annual Conference requires appropriate and adequate leadership training. The Conference needs a training center for pastors (in service) and for lay workers. The center would be similar in function to the Institute of Government located at Chapel Hill, North Carolina, and would properly be named "Local Church Institute." The functions of such an institute would be to provide, (1) in-service training institutes for pastors, (2) institutes to train lay persons in local church leadership, (3) Institutes to train lay persons for preaching (certified lay speakers), (4) institutes to train lay persons for church expansion work such as that listed in *Discipline*, 1960, par. 1164.1, and (5) spiritual life retreats and schools of evangelism for pastors and lay persons (leaders).

IV

The Annual Conference is requested to hereby approve the above mentioned needed projects, in principle, and to approve the seeking of ways and means to implement same.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Conference Board of Trustees, primarily through its Executive Committee, has had a relatively busy year. The Board has met its primary responsibilities of safeguarding and protecting the interests and rights of the Annual Conference in all matters relating to property and rights to property. The investment and management of funds held for the Conference and its agencies has been entrusted to the Methodist Foundation, Inc. serving as agent for the Board of Trustees. The report of the Foundation, a creature of the North Carolina Conference, which reflects fully the financial position of the Foundation and identifies clearly funds held for the Trustees appears in the JOURNAL of the Conference. Two members of the Board of Trustees are members of the Foundation Board and participated in the activities of the past year.

At the request of the Board of Pensions of the Conference, \$3,500 from the current earnings of the funds held in trust was transferred to them for their use. The remaining earnings, at the request of the Board of Pensions, was left with the Foundation for reinvestment.

The annual meeting of the Board of Trustees required in their By-Laws was held in Rocky Mount during the Annual Conference session on June 27, 1960. A subsequent called meeting was held in Raleigh on November 7, 1960.

The following matters pertaining to properties held by the Board of Trustees or in which the Conference had a potential interest are brought to the attention of the Conference:

(1) A quit claim deed was executed by the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees for a piece of land located in Wayne County, North Carolina, which had been willed by John M. Mitchell to his wife, Minnie O. Mitchell, for her lifetime and at her death to the Trustees of the Pine Forest Methodist Church. The will contained a further provision that if the Church ceased to exist the properties would be sold and proceeds turned over to the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church. The Pine Forest Church with the concurrence of the District Superintendent desired to sell the property and apply the proceeds to the remainder of the construction costs of the John M. Mitchell Memorial Sunday School Building. The quit claim deed was required in order for the Pine Forest Church Trustees to be able to give clear title to the property.

(2) A note in the amount of \$650,000 was executed with the First Citizens Bank and Trust Company, Raleigh, North Carolina, and a Corporation Deed of Trust given encumbering the land on which the Conference headquarters building will be situated. The instruments were executed for the purposes of procuring funds for the construction of the Methodist Building. In this connection, the following resolution was passed at the called meeting on November 7, 1960:

"Whereas, The North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church adopted Report No. 2 of the Commission on World Service and Finance authorizing the Board of Trustees of The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church, Incorporated to sign the necessary notes and deeds of trust to produce the funds for planning and construction of a new Conference Headquarters Building as designed by the special committee appointed in connection therewith; and

"Whereas, at a special session of the Conference held at the Jarvis Memorial Church in Greenville, North Carolina, September 9, 1960, the majority report of the special committee to study the plans of the Conference Headquarters Building was approved as follows:

"Therefore, we, members of the Reporting Committee, move that this special session of the Annual Conference direct the Building Committee to proceed with the construction contracts and the financial arrangements including the borrowing and giving security for such funds by deed of trust on said property as may be necessary and appropriate to effect completion of the Conference Headquarters Building for the Glory of God and the service of our large and growing Conference; and

"Whereas, the Building Committee has completed plans for said Conference Building and has taken bids showing that said building will cost approximately \$650,000; and

"Whereas, arrangements have been made with the First Citizens Bank and Trust Company to loan said sum of \$650,000 for the construction of said Conference Building, the same to be financed with a permanent loan after completion;

"BE IT RESOLVED, that the action of the President and Secretary taken in the name of The Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church, Incorporated in executing and delivering to the First Citizens Bank and Trust Company one note dated November 1, 1960 in the sum of \$650,000 with interest at six percent payable quarterly, said note to be payable on demand be hereby ratified; Further that their action in executing and delivering a deed of trust conveying the site of the proposed Conference Headquarters Building to Victor E. Bell, Jr., Trustee, to secure said demand note for \$650,000 be also ratified; and finally, that this resolution vest in them full authority for the action taken.

"I, John M. Dozier, do certify that I am Secretary of The Board of Trustees of The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church, Incorporated; that the foregoing resolution is a true copy of the resolution adopted at a meeting of the Corporation held in Raleigh, North Carolina, pursuant to due notice, on the 7th day of November, 1960.

(3) A statement was prepared pertaining to the request for a Judicial Council ruling on the legality and constitutionality of Section 2 of the report of the Study Committee in Reference to Corporation Auxiliary to and/or controlled by the Conference. This material and supporting financial exhibits were prepared at the request of the Secretary of the Judicial Council and forwarded to the Council for their consideration.

(4) A lease agreement was approved and executed leasing space for a five year period with renewal privilege for two additional five year periods to the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Insurance Company. This tenant is considered to be an especially stable and desirable occupant for the Methodist Building.

In November, 1951 the present Certificate of Incorporation was officially filed and the present By-Laws were adopted. These documents both approved by the Conference contain the following statements:

(1) *Certificate of Incorporation*: Article III, C—"And in order properly to prosecute the objects and purposes herein set forth the corporation shall have full power and authority to own or hold, mortgage, lease, sell, transfer, exchange, convey and otherwise dispose of all kinds of property both real and personal . . . to select and employ suitable agents, employees and attorneys and pay reasonable compensation for their services, and generally to perform all acts which may be deemed necessary or expedient for the proper and successful prosecution of any of the objects or purposes for which the corporation is created . . .

(2) *By-Laws*: Article IV, Section 4—"The Board of Directors may employ such agents, employees or representatives as in the judgment of the Directors shall be necessary to carry on the work of the corporation, prescribe the duties of such officers, agents and employees, fix their compensation, and may dismiss any appointive officer, agent or employee without previous notice.

In the report of the Board of Trustees approved by the Annual Conference Session in 1956 the following item appears:

"Motion by D. A. Clarke, seconded by C. P. Womack, that the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Conference approve the turning over the assets of the Board as indicated in the Treasurer's Report as of July 1, 1956, to the Methodist Fund, Inc. of the North Carolina Conference, which fund or management assumes the responsibility for the management of the fund, and which management is responsible to the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Conference for the proceeds derived from the funds committed to the management care of the Methodist Fund, Inc. approved by unanimous vote."

The serious implication of the objection to "commingling" funds raised by the Study Committee Report seems to the Board of Trustees worthy of note in this report. The Trustees feel that they have acted legally, ethically, and wisely in placing in the hands of the Methodist Foundation, Inc. as its chosen agent the funds held in trust for the Conference. All funds held by the Foundation belong in reality to the Conference, and the security and effective management provided by the Foundation make their selection as the Trustee's agent proper.

III

The Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of the Methodist Church was first incorporated in November, 1951. A resolution stating that "immediate steps be taken to organize a corporation - - - to be chartered under the laws of the State of North Carolina" was passed at the Annual Conference Session in Wilmington on November 2, 1951. On November 7, 1951 a Certificate of Incorporation was issued to the trustees by the Secretary of State of North Carolina. This Certificate was filed and recorded by the Clerk of Superior Court in Durham County, North Carolina on November 30, 1951.

Report Number II which appears in the book of reports contains excerpts from both the Certificate of Incorporation and its Board of Directors in fiscal matters. Because of

the implications of the Study Committee Report presented to the 1960 session of the Annual Conference, both as to the investment practices of the trustees and as to certain other details of these documents, revisions have been made in both and are presented here for the information and approval of the Conference.

CERTIFICATE OF INCORPORATION
OF
THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL
CONFERENCE, SOUTHEASTERN JURISDICTION

METHODIST CHURCH, INCORPORATED

This is to certify that we, the undersigned, do hereby associate ourselves into a non-stock corporation under and by virtue of the laws of the State of North Carolina, as contained in Chapter 55 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, entitled "Corporations," and the several amendments thereto and to that end do hereby set forth:

1

The name of this corporation is The Board of Trustees of The North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of the Methodist Church, Incorporated.

2

The location of the principal office of the corporation in this state is at Raleigh, Wake County, North Carolina.

3

This corporation shall be under the jurisdiction, control and direction of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of the Methodist Church. The objects for which this corporation is formed are as follows:

(a) To receive, collect, and hold in trust any and all donations, bequests, and devises of any kind or character, real or personal, that may be given, devised, bequeathed or conveyed to the said Board or to the Annual Conference as such for any benevolent, charitable, or religious purpose and to administer the same and the income therefrom in accordance with provisions set out in the by-laws of this corporation and in the Discipline of the Methodist Church.

(b) To intervene and take all necessary steps to safeguard and protect the interests and rights of the Annual Conference or its membership in all matters relating to property and rights to property whether arising by gift, devise, or otherwise, or whether held in trust or established for the benefit of the Annual Conference or its membership.

(c) And in order properly to prosecute the objects and purposes herein set forth the corporation shall have full power and authority to own or hold any property of whatever nature and wherever situated; to purchase, lease, and otherwise acquire, and to hold, mortgage, lease, sell, transfer, exchange, convey and otherwise dispose of all kinds of property both real and personal, both in this state and in all other states, territories and dependencies of the United States or other countries; invest and reinvest funds and property in such securities or properties as it shall deem suitable; to execute and deliver any proxies, powers of attorney, deeds and agreements that it shall deem necessary or proper; to select and employ suitable agents, employees and attorneys and pay reasonable compensation for their services; and generally to perform all acts which may be deemed necessary or expedient for the proper and successful prosecution of any of the objects or purposes for which the corporation is created with all the powers now or hereafter conferred by the laws of the State of North Carolina upon similar corporations.

The corporation is to have no capital stock.

5

The period of existence of this corporation is unlimited. In the event, however, of the dissolution of this corporation, or in the event the corporation ceases to perform the objects and purposes for which it was incorporated, all properties of the corporation shall become the property of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of the Methodist Church, subject to the debts of the corporation, and subject to such trusts as may have been created and subject to such reversionary interest as may have been created in said corporation.

The membership of this corporation shall consist of representatives from the Annual Conference to be selected in the manner set out in the by-laws of this corporation.

8

The Board of Directors shall have, and it is hereby specifically given, full power and authority to alter or amend this certificate of incorporation in any and all respects, with the proviso that any alteration or amendment shall have been approved by the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church.

BY-LAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE NORTH CAROLINA
 ANNUAL CONFERENCE, SOUTHEASTERN JURISDICTION,
 OF THE METHODIST CHURCH, INC.

Article I

Membership

Section 1. The membership of this corporation shall be limited to nine persons who must be at least twenty-one years of age and shall be ministers in the effective relation in the Annual Conference or members in good standing of churches within the bounds of the Annual Conference. They shall be elected by the Annual Conference for a term of three years, except the initial membership, one-third of whom shall be elected for a term of one year, one-third for a term of two years, and one-third for a term of three years and shall serve until their successors have been elected. Vacancies in the membership shall be filled at the next meeting of the Annual Conference.

Article II

Board of Directors

Section 1. The Board of Directors of this corporation shall be composed of the members of the corporation.

Article III

Meetings of Directors

Section 1. The annual meeting of the Board of Directors of the corporation shall be held during the time and at the place of the annual meeting of the Annual Conference. Special meetings may be held as determined from time to time by the directors and may be called by the president at any time and shall be called by him upon the request of three Directors.

Section 2. At any meeting of the Board of Directors, a majority of the entire Board shall constitute a quorum.

Section 3. No notice of the annual meetings of the Board of Directors shall be required. For the call of special meetings, three days' notice shall be given to each director by mail to his last known address.

Article IV

Powers and Duties of Directors

Section 1. The business, property and affairs of this corporation shall be managed by the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Board of Directors shall have full power and authority to alter or amend the certificate of incorporation of this corporation and shall likewise have full power and authority to make, alter, amend or repeal any and all by-laws of the corporation, so long as any amendment, alteration or change shall have been approved by the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church.

Section 3. The Board of Directors at the annual meeting of the corporation shall elect by ballot a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The President and Vice-President shall be members and Directors of the corporation, but neither the Secretary nor the Treasurer is required to be a member or Director of the corporation. The President and Vice-President shall hold office for one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Secretary and the Treasurer shall hold office at the will of the Board of Directors. All vacancies among the officers of the corporation shall be filled as soon as practicable by the Board of Directors at any regular or special meeting of the Board of Directors.

Section 4. The Board of Directors may employ such agents, employees or representatives as in the judgment of the Directors shall be necessary to carry on the work of the corporation, prescribe the duties of such officers, agents and employees, fix their compensation, and may dismiss any appointive officer, agent or employee without previous notice.

Specifically, the Board of Directors is given the authority to place with the Methodist Foundation, Inc., a creature of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church, such funds as it may deem proper for the purpose of investment by the Foundation. The Methodist Foundation, Inc. serving as an agent for the trustees shall be required to keep an accurate accounting of all funds held and invested for the Board of Trustees. Further, a financial report shall be placed in the hands of the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees once each quarter, indicating the investment transactions during the period, the valuation of all funds of the Foundation and showing specifically the funds held for the Board of Trustees. A certified copy of an annual audit performed by a certified public accountant shall be placed in the hands of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees annually. The Methodist Foundation shall have as a fully qualified and voting member one representative elected by the Conference Board of Trustees. Finally, any funds of the North Carolina Annual Conference held in trust by the Board of Trustees and placed in the hands of the Methodist Foundation, Inc., for investment must be payable to the Board of Trustees or demand, as its equity appears.

Section 5. The Board of Directors shall have power to designate the officers and agents of the corporation who shall be the persons acting singly or otherwise to sign the corporate name, to execute all instruments and do all things necessary to achieve the full, complete and satisfactory transfer of all stocks, stock certificates, securities, evidences of interest or indebtedness, rights and options belonging to the corporation.

Section 6. The Board of Directors shall appoint an Executive Committee composed of three directors. Said committee to have the authority and powers as set forth in Article V, Section 6 of these by-laws.

Section 7. The Board of Directors may require any officer, agent or employee to file with the corporation a satisfactory bond conditioned for the faithful performance of his or its duties and shall require the Treasurer of the corporation to file such a bond by the corporation.

Article V

Powers and Duties of Officers and Agents

Section 1. The President of the corporation shall be the chief executive officer of the corporation. He shall preside over all meetings of the Board of Directors, and shall be ex officio a member of all standing committees. He shall have the general manage-

ment and supervision of all the affairs and business of the corporation, shall see that all orders and resolutions of the Board are carried into effect and shall have the general powers and duties of supervision and management usually vested in the office of president of a corporation.

Section 2. In the event of absence, inability or death of the President, the Vice-President shall have all powers, and perform all duties of the President until the vacancy is filled.

Section 3. The Secretary shall be ex officio the Secretary of the Board of Directors and shall preserve in the books of the corporation's true minutes of the proceedings of all meetings of the Board of Directors. He shall be the custodian of the common seal of the corporation and shall attest the same when affixed by order of the Board of Directors. He shall perform such other duties as may be delegated to him by the Board of Directors.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall collect, receive, and hold the money of the corporation, and shall have custody of all funds, securities and properties held by the corporation and shall keep in books belonging to the corporation full and accurate accounts of all receipts and disbursements; he shall deposit all moneys, securities and other valuable effects in the name of the corporation in such depositories as may be designated for that purpose by the Board of Directors. He shall disburse the funds of the corporation as he may be ordered by the Board of Directors or the Executive Committee, and shall render to the President and Directors at the regular meetings of the Board, and whenever requested by them, an account of all of his transactions as Treasurer and of the financial condition of the corporation. He shall make such new investments or alter such investments as the Board of Directors or the Executive Committee may by lawful order direct. Provided, however, that the Board may delegate all or any part of the duties of the Treasurer to other representatives, agents or employees.

Section 5. The Executive Committee shall have and exercise the authority of the Board of Directors in the management and business of the corporation between the meetings of the Board of Directors, including the power to authorize the making and altering of investments and the transfer or conveyance of any funds or properties which it holds for the purposes of investment or reinvestment; provided, however, that the said Executive Committee shall have no power to elect members, directors, or officers or to alter or amend the certificate of incorporation or the by-laws of this corporation. Any person, firm or corporation is authorized to accept assignments of securities or conveyances of property which the Executive Committee may authorize upon resolution of such committee and shall not be required to look for further authority.

Article VI

Elections

Section 1. Elections shall be held at the annual meeting of the corporation but special elections for filling vacancies occurring among the officers may be held at special meetings of the Board of Directors. Election of officers shall be by ballot.

Article VII

Salaries

Section 1. The Directors of this corporation shall serve without compensation. The President and Vice-President shall serve without compensation, and if the Secretary or Treasurer is a Director of the corporation he shall serve without compensation.

Section 2. If the Secretary is not a Director of the corporation, the Board of Directors may pay him such compensation out of funds of the corporation as shall, from time to time, be commensurate with his services to the corporation.

Section 3. If the Treasurer is not a Director of the corporation, the Board of Directors may pay him such compensation out of the funds of the corporation as shall from time to time, be commensurate with his services to the corporation.

Article VIII

Management of Funds and Properties

Section 1. All funds and properties received, collected and held in trust for the benefit of the Annual Conference shall be held and administered both as to principal

and income in accordance with the directions of the donor, trustor, or testator and in the interest of the church, society, institution, or agency contemplated by such donor, trustor or testator under the direction of the Annual Conference. When the use to be made of any donation, bequest or devise is not designated, the same shall be added to and become a part of the "Permanent Fund" of the Annual Conference.

Section 2. Disbursements of funds of the corporation shall be made only upon the written order of the Board of Directors; provided, however, that between meetings of the Board of Directors disbursements may be made upon written order of the Executive Committee.

Article IX

Audits

Section 1. Books of the corporation shall be audited annually by an independent certified public accountant.

Article X

Section 1. Amendments to these by-laws can be made by the Board of Directors in regular meetings assembled, either annual or special, and if special, then purpose of the meeting with the proposed amendment must be stated in the call.

BOARD OF COLLEGE VISITORS

Eleven of the fourteen members of the North Carolina Conference Board of College Visitors visited three of the Methodist church-related schools, Louisburg College, N. C. Wesleyan College at Rocky Mount, and Methodist College in Fayetteville on April 24, 25 and 26. One other member joined the group for one day, giving an excellent attendance record for this 1961 College Tour.

At each of the schools the Board met with administrative officials, faculty groups, and student representatives and was pleased with progress being made at the institutions. Enrollment for 1961-62 seems to be to capacity, with the new colleges admitting only as many as plans permit.

The Board was impressed with the apparent eagerness of administration officials and faculty members to maintain a high standard at each school, and was particularly happy to hear plans at the two new schools to establish excellent instruction in order to give the schools good starts toward accreditation.

In the interviews with student representatives, the Board was impressed with the earnestness of the students and their apparent pleasure at having enrolled in schools where they can receive individual attention.

At Louisburg it was learned that a pension plan had been set up, an incentive to teaching at that institution which had been lacking. The buildings at the two new colleges were inspected and found to be functional as well as attractive. The Board was impressed with the science laboratories at Wesleyan and the Student Union at Methodist College.

It was felt by the Board that a closer tie had been formed between the Conference and the colleges as a result of the three-day visits. Suggestions have been received which may lead to an even more useful visiting program in the future.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS—1960-1961

In the Quadrennial Emphases for 1960-64 major attention has been and will continue to be given to the interpretation of Christian Vocations in general, Church Vocations in particular and the ministry, specifically. "The program, rooted in the local church, will center around three basic considerations: deepening the spiritual disciplines of young people and adults to accept the Lordship of Jesus Christ; development of pastoral and parental encouragements in helping individuals to understand the meaning

of vocation and to respond to the needs of service; and conservation of decisions already made for church-related vocations through more effective programs of counseling and guidance."

I. To help to do this, during the past Conference year:

1. We co-sponsored (together with the N. C. Conference MYF) a Conference on Church Vocations at Edenton Street Methodist Church, Raleigh, N. C., April 21-23, with 123 youth and 30 adults present. Dr. Mack Stokes, Candler School of Theology, Emory U., Atlanta, Ga., was our speaker. Interest groups included: Ministry, Missionary, D.C.E., Music, Church Administration, Christian Higher Education, Medical Missions. We would like to thank Edenton Street, Dr. H. P. Powell, Host Minister, Rev. Vernon Tyson, Registrar and everyone else who helped us have a most worth-while week-end conference. Our District Directors are following up this conference with letters and personal contacts.

2. We sent each Minister: (1) a copy of *METHODIST SERVICE PROJECTS*, 1961, suggesting that they order same for each of their youth; (2) a copy of *THE LOCAL CHURCH COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS—ACTS*, suggesting that they meet with their committee and seek to carry out some of these suggestions; (3) a letter urging the observance of Ministry Sunday, May 21.

3. We have secured three new sound-filmstrips which may be rented from TRAFICO: (1) especially for Junior High, *LOOKING AHEAD TO COLLEGE AND CAREER*; (2) especially for Senior High, *CAREERS THAT MATTER*; (3) especially for ministers and adults, *COUNSELING FOR CHURCH VOCATIONS*.

II. During this coming Conference year, 1961-62:

1. There will be Tri-District Rallies on Christian Vocations and particularly The Ministry:

a. At Williamston, Saturday, March 10, 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. for Elizabeth City, New Bern and Rocky Mount Districts.

b. At Duke Memorial, Durham, Sunday, March 11, 3 p.m. to 8 p.m., for Burlington, Durham and Raleigh Districts.

c. At First Church, Clinton, Sunday, March 25, 3 p.m. to 8 p.m., for Goldsboro, Fayetteville and Wilmington Districts.

2. We hope to attend the regional vocational seminar next spring and share this.

3. We urge the observance of Ministry Sunday, May 20, 1962.

4. We encourage local churches and subdistricts to emphasize Christian and Church vocations in their meetings. Our summer youth activities will continue to emphasize these in their programs.

III. We wish to express our appreciation to:

1. Bishop Paul N. Garber, the District Superintendents, and the ministers and laymen for their support, especially to Dr. A. J. Hobbs, representative of the cabinet.

2. Our District Directors of Christian Vocations: N. L. Jones, J. C. Alexander, Jr., H. F. Leatherman, R. C. Mooney, Jr., C. H. Mercer, J. M. Cline, T. J. Barrett, R. L. Baldrige, Allen Wentz, Jr. as well as the rest of our commission.

3. Every minister and layman who is living his vocation and encouraging others to do the same. Let us work and pray that more youth and adults serve in and through Christian and Church-related vocations.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE AND THE WESLEYAN SERVICE GUILD

The first year of a new quadrennium has come to a close. There has been some growth and many problems. The most serious problem has been the lack of new workers. The work in the Glendon Area had to be closed because of lack of personnel. Opportunities are before us; funds are available, but workers are not.

The Annual Meeting of the Woman's Society held in Hayes Barton Church, Raleigh, April 11-13 and of the Guild in Raleigh at Edenton Street Church April 8-9 followed the theme "The Faith That Compels Us." Attendance at both meetings exceeded expectations and the program was of such a quality and content as to give the women something to think about and to enrich their spiritual lives for days to come.

Statistics may seem dull but not so if one sees beyond the figures the dreams, hopes, and service of dedicated women who seek to bring about the realization of our purpose. Last year we reported 24 unorganized churches and now there are 26 still without a society or guild, and yet we have had an increase in both societies and guilds. At present there are 762 societies, 36 district members and 75 Guild Units with a total membership of 34,988—a net increase of 970 members.

There has also been an increase in finances. The Conference Treasurer reports the amount of \$206,075.32 sent to the Woman's Division for the year 1960-1961. Reports also show that at least \$135,830.63 have been spent on Local Church Activities. This is not an accurate figure for all societies do not report this item.

Our workers within the conference at present are Miss Mamie Chandler, Deaconess at the Student Center at East Carolina College, Miss Rebecca Moddelmog, employed worker in the Pembroke Area in the Wilmington District, and Miss Barbara Jean Smith, US2, who has come to us to work with Miss Moddelmog in Pembroke. Our conference supports Miss Sudie Hunt Doughton at Santiago, Chile.

In August the final payment was made on the Methodist Student Center in Greenville, and in September dedication services were held with Bishop Garber presiding. At present a study is being made as to how the program there may be enlarged to meet the increasing enrollment.

There has been a realization of the rapid social changes taking place today, and we have been trying to find ways to make the program of this organization more relevant to the needs of the woman in the local church in such a way as to strengthen the church. An evaluation of our scholarship program is under way as well as a study of rural work, and the problem of recruitment in the light of whether or not we are fulfilling *our mission today*. Our faith compels us to face up to our opportunities and responsibilities in these days of confusion.

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

Your Commission on World Service and Finance feels compelled to urge with all sincerity, the need for stewardship to be practiced by every individual Methodist in this conference. Such an enlightened life, might well have its roots in an Every Member Canvass within the home church, and we complement the DISCIPLINE in requesting that every minister lead his church to an Every Member Canvass during the year 1961-62.

While we are cognizant that the Gifts and Wills program is costing a sizeable amount, nevertheless, we believe we are planting the seeds of what Christian Gospel is all about in directing people's attention to eternal values, so we strongly urge that this program be maintained.

The Commission views with alarm the actions within our conference which wittingly or unwittingly seek to minimize our prime and definite responsibility, already once assumed, to continue to increase our College Sustaining program at the rate of \$40,000.00 per year until the plateau of \$500,000.00 annually is achieved. On two occasions, we have watched, and/or have been a party to, official action which has held the line. At this time we do not believe this action can be justified, if we are to keep faith with the coming generations of Methodist youth and college students. We recommend that this annual conference irrefutably accept this program for which we as a Conference have obligated ourselves.

The theme of our Commission is to practice, in co-operation with all agencies a program of getting the most from our conference dollar. Everyone should search their program and devise effective savings in budget. We are going to examine minutely our expenditures in order that a greater percentage of our dollar be channelled into causes.

Allocations to the charges shall be made by the District Superintendents.

The total funds received from the acceptances for the combined Benevolences shall be distributed thus: Each cause shall be paid proportionately out of the income from acceptances up to the amount fixed in the budget. Any surplus shall be held by the conference treasurer to be expended by the Annual Conference upon recommendation of the Commission. Provided, however, in the event collections under Item No. 7, Benevolences, shall fall short to an extent which cannot be bridged by the Contingency Fund, the Commission requests authority within its discretion to pay in full certain items in the budget (World Service, General Administration). The remaining sum available will be paid proportionately to the remaining budget items.

II

LIMITING AND SUPPLEMENTING PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE BUDGET

1. Apportionments against pastor's salary are defined to include the salary of the pastor and associate pastor under Episcopal appointment.

2. (a) The annual salary of each of the 9 district superintendents shall be set at \$9,000.00 including travel and utilities (water \$60, heating \$300, electricity \$180, residential telephone \$60, up to a total of \$600.00).

(b) "We approve the use of an amount up to \$3,000 to be provided by each district for the district superintendent for secretarial help and promotion of the district program."

3. The Commission recommends that each person who has authority to draw checks against an account of a conference agency be required to present annually to the full membership of his agency a complete list of all checks drawn, justifying all checks with the budget approved by his agency.

4. The Commission recommends that each agency whose accounts are not audited in the treasurer's office be required to have an annual audit made and furnish this commission with a copy of it.

5. A. Under the Church Extension Fund the first \$25,000.00 is earmarked to be paid to the Board of Missions, Inc., for the revolving fund in order to provide security for money borrowed by the Board of Missions, Inc., used for loans to build churches.

B. The amount under Section A is considered a fixed obligation annually through conference year 1963-64, or until the borrowed money is fully repaid.

6. We recommend distribution of the College Sustaining Fund as included in the report of Commission on Christian Higher Education reviewed by this Commission.

7. The district superintendents will establish suitable apportionments for new

churches, and adjust apportionments where other charge changes occur; provided also where circuits are divided any church involved in the division that must receive minimum salary, may upon the consent of the district superintendent, pay their former proportionate share of the items based on pastoral support and total money raised, plus an additional 20% of this amount of first-year division. This shall be increased by at least 20% of the original base annually until they achieve the then current base of established charges in a period not to exceed four years.

8. The Commission on World Service and Finance calls attention to page 7, Item F of the **Manual on Finance for The Methodist Church** which states: "That each Annual Conference shall have the right to fix its acceptance, after the apportionment has been presented and explained by the Bishop and the Annual Conference Commission on World Service and Finance." (As quoted from the **Daily Christian Advocate**, April 30, 1956.)

Our North Carolina Annual Conference in session in Rocky Mount (page 266, 1960 Journal) set its acceptance and the monies now being paid can be considered as meeting this commitment in full.

III

The Commission recommends approval of the following Specials to be arranged by Special Offerings or included in the local church budget. If budgeted, the amount should be liberal. Remit to conference treasurer.

Advance Special (General) World Missions and National Missions.

Advance Special Conference.

Christmas Offering, 1961 only, Gilbert-Lambuth Memorial (Quota \$16,000.00).

Church School Rally Day for Leadership Training.

The Television Ministry of The Methodist Church.

Fellowship of Suffering and Service (World-wide communion).

Race Relations Sunday (Paine College).

One Great Hour of Sharing (Fund No. 15).

Methodist Retirement Homes Special (Mother's Day).

Methodist Student Day.

Thanksgiving Offering (Special for Methodist Home for Children as an addition or supplement to the operating budget).

IV

We make reference to the report of the Conference Entertainment Committee which merits your careful attention and action at the appropriate time.

The need for a Capital Funds Campaign for our institutions is self-evident. Referral has been made to the Long Range Planning Committee for a study, and we call your attention to their report for action.

With reference to United College Appeal, we refer to the Report of the Commission on Christian Higher Education for appropriate action.

The Annual Conference for 1956 authorized the directors of Methodist Fund, Incorporated (now Methodist Foundation, Inc.) to act concurrently as investment committee for funds handled by the Central Treasury. We recommend continuance of this authority.

We call attention of this Annual Conference to the 1% Plan as adopted by the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference and the Southeastern Jurisdictional Council. It is our understanding that this plan for the training of our ministerial candidates is a voluntary plan and that this Commission concurs in the basic concept and principle of the proposal.

V

We recommend approval of the requests of the following agencies for the privilege of soliciting funds throughout the conference:

1. The Capital Funds Campaign for our colleges.

2. Wesley Foundation Commission for special gifts for the benefit of special works in the state supported institutions.

3. The Board of Missions for the promotion of the Church Extension Ten Dollar Club.

4. That the Board of Education be authorized to solicit from churches, groups, and individuals, materials and money for specific projects for the camps of the North Carolina Conference.

5. Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated, for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto.

6. We commend the program of the Board of Lay Activities to promote Stewardship and Tithing throughout the conference embodying:

(a) District Schools to train leaders.

(b) Charge leaders in turn to conduct schools to train members for Every Member Canvass.

(c) Also, we approve for the Board of Lay Activities a continuing campaign to raise a student loan or scholarship fund for people going into full-time ministry. The funds to be used at Louisburg College, Methodist College and North Carolina Wesleyan College.

7. The Methodist Foundation, Inc., as provided in its charter.

8. The Town and Country Commission, Rural Church Fund, for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto.

9. The Methodist Home for Children for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto.

The Commission states that all the foregoing approvals are for the year 1961-62 and that at the time of the 1962 budget hearings the entire program of further solicitation will be reviewed and studied.

VI

We recommend to charge or church treasurers that they set up a schedule for remitting at a fixed time each month and to close the year as early as possible. Final remittance should be mailed on Monday two weeks preceding the opening of Conference.

The pastors bear responsibility to check with treasurers for full remittance of all budgeted items and all funds collected as specials and to harmonize their reports to Annual Conference with conference treasurer's acknowledgments both received and pending.

We report the issuance of a Fidelity Bond in Employers Mutual Casualty Company of Des Moines, Iowa, to cover the Conference Treasurer in the amount of \$100,000.00 and to cover the Assistant to the Treasurer in the amount of \$25,000.00; others to a minimum amount of \$10,000.00 in said office. Also to cover others handling funds: Director of Christian Higher Education \$100,000.00, Superintendent of Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., \$50,000.00 and others to the amount of \$10,000.00 in various offices.

We recommend the continuation of A. M. Pullen & Company as auditors.

SPECIAL RESOLUTION BY COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

The Commission on World Service and Finance was primarily responsible for the chartering of Methodist Foundation, Inc. in 1955, and has had a greater proportion representation in the management of the corporation since it was formed. The Foundation is a creature of the Annual Conference and can handle no business except that which derives from, or is for, the benefit of the Annual Conference, its agencies or causes.

The Foundation has done a most remarkable job in the management of the funds entrusted to it. These funds derive from:

1. Central Funds of the Conference Treasury.
2. Conference Board of Pensions.
3. Ministers Retirement Fund.
4. Conference Board of Trustees.
5. Rural Church Fund.
6. Department of Gifts and Wills of Methodist Foundation, Inc.

Other agencies are eligible and will participate.

The bedrock upon which the Foundation operates as an investment agency is that it commingles the funds of the conference agencies and invests them in diversified securities so that each holder of Capital Units has a pro-rata interest in each and every investment of the Foundation. This tends towards safety and each and every investment is carefully supervised under the direction of the best available investment service.

The principle of the commingling of these funds is in keeping with the handling of funds by the General Board of Pensions for the Board of Pensions for the various annual conferences of The Methodist Church.

Also, since the funds which are mixed are entirely within the program of the North Carolina Conference, there is good reason to deny that "commingling" exists for the reason that we are all one family.

The Commission on World Service and Finance requests the Annual Conference to endorse the manner of operation of The Methodist Foundation, Incorporated and its

use by any and all agencies of the Annual Conference in accordance with its charter which was approved by our annual conference.

The Commission further recommends that the annual reports of the audit of accounts of the Conference Treasurer for Methodist Foundation, Inc., published in the *Journal* from year to year be approved as sufficient permanent records of the transactions between the several agencies and the Foundation and such reports shall be equivalent of certificates of ownership by the various agencies for their investment in the Foundation.

As reported in the 1960 conference *Journal* on page 211, the directors of the Foundation permit withdrawal of Capital Units based upon values as determined by the directors of the Foundation.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

"Common worship is the Church's grateful celebration of God's deed in Jesus Christ her Lord." This rediscovery of the Church's unique and central purpose is responsible for the world-wide liturgical renewal, for the call by our General Conference for a recovery of theology and of worship, and for the formation of Annual Conference commissions such as ours. For as we perceive that our diverse ministries root in a single and central service to Jesus Christ as Lord, we are able to pray that our competing conference enterprises may be judged, purified, and united to advance the gracious purposes of God.

Thus viewing ourselves as young among conference commissions, yet entrusted with responsibilities of central import, we report these modest but encouraging advances this year: In co-operation with the Conference Board of Education, a series of district workshop meetings with superintendents and pastors in which we presented the Revised Services and their role in enhanced ministry. Although brief, these meetings both revealed and stimulated interest, and suggested that we need general discussion of the disciplines of leading our people in the corporate devout life.

The chairman and secretary participated in the annual music workshops by the Board of Education, at which the revised Service of Communion was studied and celebrated.

Members of the commission have offered courses in worship in several leadership schools.

Commissions on Worship are in being in several local churches, with the pastors reporting a deepening tone in the life of the church.

With the sponsorship of the Jurisdictional Secretaries, a meeting of commission officers and delegated representatives from each conference was recently held, at which was formed a Jurisdictional Fellowship to aid in the formation of conference and local commissions and the study of the Revised Services.

We have encouraged the study and use in local churches of the Revised Services—notably Holy Communion—and with uniformly favorable reports.

We have co-operated with Bishop and Cabinet in restoring to our Annual Conference the celebration of Holy Communion, and we look forward eagerly to the recovery of this venerable corporate fellowship with our Lord. And we hope—and predict—that as our ministers participate in the gracious revised liturgy, we shall wish for our people the same opportunity.

This leads us to call to your attention the services we offer you here at conference and in the year ahead.

As promised at the district workshops, we hold for each minister a copy of the Revised Services, and we invite you to secure it from members of the commission of worship.

We also announce that any pastor may borrow from us copies of the brochure (notably the Revised Service of Communion) sufficient for use in his church, by apply-

ing to the chairman, c/o The Divinity School, Duke University. (Please allow at least two weeks notice if at all possible.)

We plan, subject to arrangement with each District Superintendent, and in co-operation with the Commission on Evangelism, to offer a series of workshops in early 1962, studying the evangelistic and liturgical opportunities surrounding the baptism of infants and the reception of youth into the church, and we shall call for study and use of the Revised Services of Baptism and Confirmation and Church Membership as we follow our Bishops' plan to make Christ Lord of the Church through instruction for church membership.

Finally, it is now our pleasant privilege to recognize explicitly what we have implied: namely, the gracious interest and co-operation of all—Bishop and Cabinet, ministers, district members of our Commission, both ministerial and lay—and of laymen throughout the Conference. You demonstrate that although we have not yet entered into our Methodist heritage of wise and reverent study and use of the time-honored means of grace, we all desire to render "our bounden duty and service" of prayer and praise to God and to lead our people in the Christian life. And though among our fellowship there are diversities of experiences, of forms, of talents, and even of doctrines, where better can we experience our unity of faith and work than in our common offering of devotion to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ?

*°PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS (¶ 10, 22)

Proposed Amendment No. 12 to the Constitution of the Methodist Church Concerning the Jurisdictional System

At its sixth quadrennial session held in Denver, Colorado, April 27-May 7, 1960, the General Conference of The Methodist Church by more than the constitutional majority of two-thirds ($\frac{2}{3}$) vote, on Monday evening, May 2, 1960, voted to send down to the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for their consideration and action, the following proposed Amendment to the Constitution of The Methodist Church.

1. Division Two, Section 1, Article 1 (Par. 5) shall be amended to read as follows:

Article 1.—The General Conference shall be composed of not fewer than 900 nor more than 1,400 delegates, one half of whom shall be ministers and one half lay members, to be elected by the Annual Conference.

2. Division Two, Section IV, Article IV (Par. 14) shall be amended to read as follows:

Article IV.—Each Jurisdictional Conference shall convene (a) at the time and place of the General Conference, or (b) not more than sixty days prior to the date of the General Conference at such time and place as the preceding session of the Jurisdictional Conference, or its delegated committee, by a two-thirds vote, may determine.

3. Division Two, Section V, Article III (Par. 18) shall be amended to read as follows:

Article III.—Each Central Conference shall meet within one year preceding or one year following the meeting of the General Conference at such times and places as shall have been determined by the preceding respective Central Conferences or by commissions appointed by them.

4. Division Two, Section VII, Article III (Par. 23) shall be amended to read as follows:

Article III.—The Annual Conference shall elect ministerial and lay delegates to the General Conference and to its Jurisdictional or Central Conference in the manner provided in this section, Articles IV and V, at the session preceding the Jurisdictional Conference. The persons elected, up to the number determined by the ratio for representation in the General Conference, shall be representatives in that body, and also in

the Jurisdictional or Central Conference; provided that Annual and Provisional Annual Conferences of a Central Conference shall elect delegates for such Central Conferences to complete the number determined by the General Conference for representation in the Central Conference. The Annual Conference shall also elect reserve ministerial and lay delegates to serve both at the General Conference and the Jurisdictional or Central Conference as it may deem desirable.

5. Division Three, Article II (Par. 35) shall be amended to read as follows:

Article II.—The bishops shall be elected by the respective Jurisdictional and Central Conferences, and consecrated in the historic manner of episcopal Methodism. The bishops elected by the respective Jurisdictional Conferences shall be consecrated at the General Conference which meets concurrently or immediately following. The bishops elected by Central Conferences shall be consecrated at the electing Central Conference or at the next succeeding General Conference, as the Central Conference may determine.

6. Division Three, Article V (Par. 38) shall be amended to read as follows:

Article V.—There shall be a General Conference Committee on Episcopacy composed of all the members of the Committees on Episcopacy of the several Jurisdictional Conferences, which:

1. May make proposals involving the transfer of bishops from one jurisdiction to another where said transfer (a) has been approved by a two-thirds majority of the members of the Committee on Episcopacy of the jurisdiction to which the transfer is to be made; (b) has not been disapproved by a two-thirds majority of the members of the Committee on Episcopacy of the jurisdiction out of which the transfer is to be made; and (c) has been consented to by the bishop involved.

2. Shall receive and accept the assignment of bishops as made or finally approved by the several Jurisdictional Conferences after all transfers, if any, have been acted upon.

3. Shall announce to the General Conference the assignments made, or finally approved, by the respective Jurisdictional Conferences of all bishops, and no official announcement of the assignments of bishops shall be made prior thereto.

The General Conference upon receiving the announcement of its Committee on Episcopacy may not change the assignments within a jurisdiction. The General Conference upon receiving the announcement of its Committee on Episcopacy may not change transfers as announced by its committee or initiate proposals for transfer except (a) by a majority vote of the General Conference, and (b) by a majority vote of the Jurisdictional Conferences which are involved in the proposed transfer.

A bishop may be assigned by the Council of Bishops for presidential service or other temporary service, not to exceed a year, in another jurisdiction than that which elected him, provided request is made by a majority of the bishops in the jurisdiction of the proposed service.

In the case of an emergency in any jurisdiction through the death or disability of its bishops, the Council of Bishops may assign one or more bishops from other jurisdictions to the work of the said jurisdiction with the consent of a majority of the bishops of that jurisdiction.

*The Constitutional Amendment was rejected. Vote: For 33; Against 342.

AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES OF ORDER AND PROCEDURE OF NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

(Section VIII, Article 1. Conference Rules)

1. MOTION TO AMEND Article 1, Section III, which now reads as follows: "All reports and resolutions presented to the conference shall be written (typewritten if possible) in triplicate. Two copies shall be in the hands of the conference secretary before the report or resolution shall be read to the conference for consideration."

AMEND to read: "All reports to be presented to the conference shall be sent to the conference secretary, typewritten and in triplicate, on or before the date approved for such by the Coordinating Council and published in the conference calendar."

2. MOTION TO AMEND Article 2, Section III, which now reads as follows: "Any amendment offered to any paper, and all motions must be in writing and placed in the hands of the conference secretary immediately following presentation."

AMEND to read: "All resolutions to be presented to the annual conference affecting the structure, policy and function of any board or agency of the annual conference, shall be submitted in writing to the conference secretary with copies for all the delegates twenty-four hours prior to consideration by the annual conference, and not later than the second night session of the conference."

3. MOTION TO ADD Article 3 to Section III, to read as follows: "All motions presented to the annual conference, and amendments to any paper, shall be in writing (in triplicate) and placed in the hands of the conference secretary at the time of presentation."

4. MOTION TO AMEND Article 2, Section V, which now reads as follows: "Charge and Church treasurers shall mail their final remittance for the current year to the conference treasurer on the second Monday preceding the opening date of the annual conference and each pastor shall complete and mail Table II to the conference statistician immediately thereafter."

AMEND to read: "Charge and Church treasurers shall make final remittance for the current year to the conference treasurer on or before the opening date of the annual conference, and each pastor shall complete and submit Table II to the conference statistician on or before the opening date of the annual conference."

RESOLUTIONS

°°RESOLUTIONS CONCERNING THE CLARIFICATION OF PARAGRAPHS 1450 AND 1452 OF THE 1960 DISCIPLINE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

Because the Conference Board of Education historically has been charged with solemn responsibilities in the field of Christian Higher Education, it has carefully examined questions relating to its functions in this particular area. In order to insure that there be no division in our common effort and loyalty to our magnificent program of Christian higher education, it has passed without dissent the following resolution for presentation to the North Carolina Conference:

We call attention to an apparent conflict of duties of the Annual Conference Board of Education and the Annual Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education as described in Paragraphs 1450 and 1452 of the 1960 Discipline of the Methodist Church, to wit:

Paragraph 1450 states, "The president, or someone designated by him, shall present to the Commission on World Service and Finance of the Conference the financial needs of the colleges and Wesley Foundations related to the Conference (as determined by the board on recommendation of its Committee or Commission on Christian Higher Education) - - - The board shall determine the distribution of the funds thus received to each of the general interests under the care of the board."

Paragraph 1452, states—4. "The Committee or Commission shall: (c) Report annually to the board and the Annual Conference on the programs of those institutions of learning and Wesley Foundations related to the Conference and supported by it, including a statement concerning the capital and current financial needs of each and their program of service to the Methodist Church."

(d) "Recommend annually to the board, for presentation to the Annual Conference,

a minimum goal for the support of educational institutions and Wesley Foundations; or, if none are related to the Conference, recommend the method of distributing to Methodist educational institutions, either directly or through the Division of Higher Education, the funds raised for higher education.

Therefore, be it resolved that the North Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The Methodist Church, in session at Trinity Church, Durham, N. C., June 28, 1961, hereby petitions the Judicial Council of The Methodist Church to make a ruling in the nature of a "declaratory decision" under Paragraph 914 of the 1960 Discipline of The Methodist Church clarifying the responsibilities of the Annual Conference Board of Education as related to the Annual Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education as set forth in Paragraphs 1450 and 1452 of the 1960 Discipline of The Methodist Church. Specifically, we request answers to the following questions:

1. Which of these two Annual Conference Agencies has the duty of determining the financial needs of the Colleges and Wesley Foundations related to the conference for presentation to the Annual Conference Commission on World Service and Finance?

2. Which of these two Annual Conference Agencies, the Annual Conference Board of Education or the Annual Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education, has the responsibility of determining the allocation or distribution of funds raised by the Annual Conference to sustain its institutions of higher education?

3. Does the Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education report directly to the Annual Conference or to the Annual Conference Board of Education for presentation by the Annual Conference Board of Education to the Annual Conference?

4. Does the Conference Board of Education have the authority to modify the report and recommendations of the Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education before presenting the report to the Annual Conference?

RESOLUTION CONCERNING LOUISBURG COLLEGE

Whereas the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church at its session held at Rocky Mount, North Carolina, June 27-30, 1960, granted permission to the Board of Trustees of Louisburg College to borrow a sum not to exceed \$150,000 to complete the purchase price and the renovation of the W. R. Mills School property in Louisburg and to secure the loan with a deed of trust on the Mills property:

Whereas it has been found by the Board of Trustees of Louisburg College that this sum is not sufficient to complete the purchase price and to renovate the Mills School property:

Therefore, be it resolved that the Board of Trustees of Louisburg College in session April 21, 1961, requests the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church at its session in Durham, N. C., June 26-29, 1961, to grant permission to the Board of Trustees of Louisburg College to borrow an additional \$25,000, this sum to apply toward the renovation of the Mills property, thus making the total sum to be borrowed \$175,000, and to secure the loan with deed of trust on the Mills School property.

Dr. Cecil W. Robbins, president of the college, reported that Section 5 of the Certificate of Incorporation of Louisburg College, as amended, contains the following proviso or exception to the ability of the trustees of the college to convey its property:

"But no conveyance of the real property vested in said corporation shall be made without the consent and permission of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South."

By reason of the quoted part of the Certificate of Incorporation some doubt may arise as to whether or not a conveyance by the corporation will be entirely valid without the consent of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church. He therefore suggested that the trustees of Louisburg College request the North Carolina Annual Conference to give its consent and permission to the execution of the Trust Indenture securing \$290,000 Louisburg College Dormitory Bonds of 1961. Whereupon, on

motion of W. L. Lumpkin, duly seconded by W. G. Suiter, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

RESOLVED, that the trustees of Louisburg College, for and on behalf of the corporation, do request the next meeting of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church (that being the official name at the present time of the organization known in 1928 as "The Methodist Episcopal Church, South") to consent and grant its permission to the conveyance by Louisburg College, a corporation, to the First Citizens Bank and Trust Company, trustee under an Indenture dated as May 1, 1961, securing \$290,000 of Louisburg College Dormitory Bonds of 1961 of a certain tract of land described in said Indenture and a right-of-way thereto described in said Indenture; and

RESOLVED FURTHER that the president of Louisburg College and the president of the Board of Trustees of Louisburg College be and they are hereby authorized and directed to present this request to the proper board of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, and to said Conference for its consideration and adoption; and

RESOLVED FURTHER, that said proper board of the North Carolina Conference and the said Conference be requested to adopt a resolution in respect of said consent and permission to release the aforementioned property substantially as follows:

RESOLVED, that the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church, in a session of said Conference duly called and held in the City of Durham, State of North Carolina, on the 28th day of June, 1961, does hereby consent and give its permission to a conveyance by Louisburg College to the First Citizens Bank and Trust Company, Trustee, by a Trust Indenture dated as of the 1st day of May, 1961, securing \$290,000, principal amount of Louisburg College Dormitory Bonds of 1961, of that certain tract of land, a part of the property of Louisburg College, located in the City of Louisburg, Franklin County, North Carolina, described as follows:

The following described lands and premises, with all the buildings, additions or improvements, now or hereafter located thereon, and with the easements, rights, ways and appurtenances thereunto belonging or appertaining, situate and being in the City of Louisburg, Louisburg Township, Franklin County, State of North Carolina, the same being described by metes and bounds as follows:

BEGINNING at a point located north 55 degrees 00 minutes west 15 feet from the northwest corner of Main Building on the campus of Louisburg College, and runs thence south 55 degrees 00 minutes east 198 feet to a point, 12.5 feet from the northeast corner of Main Building; runs thence north 34 degrees 00 minutes east 198 feet to a 50-foot right-of-way running along the south side of the A. W. Person property and in an eastern direction to Main Street; runs thence south 61 degrees 30 minutes east along the south side of said right-of-way 158.2 feet to a point; runs thence south 34 degrees west 483 feet to a point, said point being north 34 degrees east 80 feet from a point on the north side of College Street, which said latter point is 347 feet from the northwest corner of the intersection of College Street and Main Street; runs thence north 56 degrees 30 minutes west parallel with College Street 359 feet to a point on the east side of a driveway; runs thence north 34 degrees 00 minutes east along the east side of said driveway 277 feet to the beginning, as shown by survey of Phil R. Inscoc, R. S., June, 1961, said map of said survey entitled "Map of Land Extracted from the original Louisburg College Campus including Main, Franklin and Wright Buildings."

The right to use perpetually for the purpose of ingress and egress, to pass and re-pass, by foot, with animals, with vehicles, and with any and all loads, and for any and all purposes, by the grantee-trustee, its successors and assigns, its servants, agents, employees, tenants, and invitees, in common with the college, that certain driveway adjacent to the above tract of land described as follows:

BEGINNING at a point on the west property line of North Main Street, the southeast corner of the property of A. W. Person; runs thence north 61 degrees 15 minutes west along A. W. Person's line 702 feet to a stake, the northeast corner of the new cafeteria lot as surveyed by Phil R. Inscoc, Registered Land

Surveyor, July 2, 1957; runs thence south 32 degrees 45 minutes west along the line of the new cafeteria lot 50 feet to a point; runs thence south 61 degrees 15 minutes east 702 feet, more or less, to a point in the western property line of North Main Street; runs thence in a northeastern direction along the western property line of North Main Street 50 feet to the beginning; being a strip of land lying along the northern property line of the property of Louisburg College and east of the new cafeteria building site, all according to map and survey of Phil R. Inscoc, Registered Surveyor, July 2, 1957, map of said survey being entitled "Map of Lot Extracted from the Original Louisburg College Campus as the Site for Building a New Cafeteria."

RESOLVED FURTHER, that this consent and permission be evidenced of record by an instrument in writing from the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, Incorporated, which is hereby authorized and empowered to execute and deliver said instrument to the First Citizens Bank and Trust Company as Trustee under said Indenture hereinbefore referred to, granting on behalf of the Conference the consent and permission to make said conveyance to the Trustees and quitclaiming any right which the Conference might have in the lands therein described insofar as said Trustee, its successors and assigns, is concerned.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING NORTH CAROLINA WESLEYAN COLLEGE

WHEREAS, the Executive Committee of the Board of Education of the North Carolina Conference (SE.J.) of the Methodist Church has heretofore passed a resolution consenting to and approving a loan dated June 1, 1960, to North Carolina Wesleyan College from Peoples Bank & Trust Company, Planters National Bank & Trust Company, First Citizens Bank & Trust Company and Wachovia Bank & Trust Company in a principal sum of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) for the purpose of financing the college building program. The terms of said loan are fully set forth in a resolution heretofore adopted and recorded in the minutes of the Executive Committee, and

WHEREAS, it is necessary and desirable that the college be authorized to borrow an additional amount not to exceed two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000.00) in order to complete its building program and the Planters National Bank & Trust Company of Rocky Mount and the Peoples Bank & Trust Company of Rocky Mount have agreed to make such additional loan to the college upon the same terms and conditions and with the same security as the previous loan to the college upon the same terms and conditions and with the same security as the previous loan to the college dated June 1, 1960.

RESULTS OF OPERATIONS

The results of operations of the funds, boards, and committees are presented in summary form in Exhibit "B," Statement of Income, Expense or Distribution and Fund Balance.

Mr. M. J. Cowell, Conference Treasurer, has prepared statements from his records for publication in the Conference Journal, comprising the details of the results of operations as summarized in Exhibit "B" of our report. These detailed statements, with reference numbers corresponding to Exhibit "B," are presented under the title "Treasurer's Statement of Board Operations" and have been verified by

us. The method of presentation in the Conference Treasurer's report differs from this report in the following schedules:

- Schedule H-1 The results of this statement are not presented in this report.
- Schedule N The Conference Treasurer's statement is presented on a cash receipts and disbursements basis while this report is presented on a revenue and expense basis.
- Schedule T The Conference Treasurer's statement states the securities at market value while this report states the securities at cost value.
- Schedule U The interfund investments are not eliminated as shown in Schedule 1 of this report.

SCOPE OF EXAMINATION

Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances, some features of which are referred to in the outline that follows on specific items.

Cash on deposit was confirmed directly with the banks. Recorded cash receipts were traced to their subsequent deposit in the bank on a test basis, and disbursements were verified by test examination of cancelled checks and paid invoices or authorizations. Income from charges, as shown by the Treasurer's records, was confirmed directly with the pastors, and minor differences reported to us as of the date of this report were adjusted or satisfactorily explained.

Distribution of income from charges was audited by reference to the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance for the 1960 and 1961 session of the Annual Conference and by reference to proper authorization from the various boards of the Conference.

Investments of the Treasurer and the various boards and funds were either inspected or, if held by an outside agent, confirmed by direct confirmation during the course of our examination.

Cash receipts in transit represent 1960-61 collections received by the Treasurer subsequent to the balance sheet date and were set up from deposits in the bank accounts. Accounts and apportionments payable were set up from disbursements subsequent to the balance sheet date and by reference to proper authorization for the distribution of 1960-61 collections.

OPINION

In our opinion, the accompanying balance sheet and related statement of income, expense or distribution and fund balance present fairly the financial position of M. J. Cowell, Treasurer, North Carolina Conference, S.E.J., of the Methodist Church, at June 30, 1961, and the results of operations for the 1960-61 Conference year then ended, in conformity with accounting principles of the Conference applied on a basis consistent with that of the previous year.
