The officers and leaders in all our activities are examples of constancy, fidelity and effectiveness in fulfillment of their responsibilities. I am grateful to them all as I am to staff members whose regularity and effectiveness in their work is an inspiration to me. The temptation to think of things yet to be done can blind one of the dimensions of what has been done and to the worth of what is now happening. This report will seek to avoid that trap.

The property of the Church is in excellent condition and is free of debt, both being cause for thanksgiving as well as acknowledgement of gratitude to those who see to the property and to money management. Insurance coverage has been selectively increased during the year to reflect more accurately the values involved. Steps for security of buildings and appointments have been taken though it is not possible to have absolute security in what are essen-

tially public buildings.

The spectrum of program and activity of Duke Memorial is a reason for thanksgiving and encouragement as to the future of the Church. It is our intention as faithful stewards of the Gospel to offer something of value to every one while not expecting that all will engage in every activity. In that spirit, I report that something like half the adults in Sunday School regularly go home after their class sessions, while more than half the adults in worship services did not attend Sunday School.
