Money and missions

Continuing our series on the church budget and what it buys, the Missions Committee would like to share with you about the generous support our congregation provides for local, national, and international missions, including hands-on volunteer activities sponsored and delivered by our members. Some of this work is funded from the church budget directly, in designated giving to particular projects, and some projects are funded from individual cash donations, or through gifts of food and other basic necessities. Additionally, a significant part of our annual apportionment contributes directly to mission activities, with about 10% going to the World Service fund of the general church, and another 5% going directly to the Outreach Ministry Team of the annual conference, which includes support for the Methodist children's homes and retirement communities, as well as a variety of "Matthew 25" ministries. All of these highlight the mission of Duke Memorial, and contribute to the fourth area of our vision, as we bear witness to Christ's love.
