the ordinary of the Mass. However, the **Requiem** differs from the Ordinary by eliminating or replacing some parts.

John Rutter's **Requiem** combines texts from the Requiem Mass as well as the Anglican burial service. The seven sections of this work provide a meditation on themes of life and death:

- ❖ The first movement, *Requiem Aeternam* (eternal rest) and the last movement, *Lux Aeterna* (perpetual light) are prayers on behalf of all humanity.
- ❖ The second movement, *Out of the Deep*, and the sixth movement, *The Lord is my Shepherd*, are from Psalm 130 and 23, respectively.
- ❖ The third movement, *Pie Jesu* (sweet Jesus), and the fifth movement, *Agnus Dei* (Lamb of God), are personal prayers.
- ❖ The fourth movement, *Sanctus* (holy, holy, holy) and *Benedictus* (blessed), is an acclamation of divine glory.
