3. A Time to Pause...

Worship begins with our gathering in the sanctuary, a time when we come together as the the body of Christ from our various places "in the world." After the greeting and at the beginning of the opening voluntary, the cross and lights are brought into the sanctuary, signifying the presence of God. This is a time of focusing toward God's presence, away from activity and conversation.

During the procession of the cross and the candles, all movement stops: if we are not yet seated, we wait for the acolytes and crucifer to complete their task and after they are seated, we may be seated quietly. Worshipers in the aisles or near the rail, walking to their seats, are distracting to those who are bringing in the cross and lights and to those seated. The ushers will continue to close the doors during this part of the service. Please honor the closed doors and pause where you are to wait for this act of worship to be completed before moving in the sanctuary.
