

HYMN FOR JANUARY

"O Sing a Song of Bethlehem" Louis F. Benson, 1899

Hymn No. 177

It has been said about those who have turned from law to the ministry that "they probably practiced more economy than law." This would not apply to Dr. Benson, who after graduation from the School of Law at the University of Pennsylvania had a successful practice for seven years. Feeling a deep inner urge toward the ministry, he enrolled at Princeton Theological Seminary and was ordained in 1886. He served as minister at the Church of the Redeemer at Germantown, Philadelphia for six years, resigning to become the editor of the hymnals for the Presbyterian Church. He became widely known as a thoroughgoing scholar in the field of hymnology. He edited THE HYMNAL (Presbyterian), published in 1895, which set a new standard for church hymns for the nonliturgical churches. Dr. Benson edited many hymnbooks, and with Dr. Henry Van Dyke he helped to edit THE BOOK OF COMMON WORSHIP OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN THE U.S. Born July 22, 1855, in Philadelphia, he passed away in the same city on October 10, 1930. He bequeathed his large and valuable hymnological library to Princeton Theological Seminary.



Presentation of the General Assembly Emphasis for the Year: CHRISTIAN VOCATION

Lives of quiet desperation. Businessmen plodding through days of emptiness and on-the-job frustration. Men quietly nursing ulcers in a search for success. Homemakers facing the daily drabness of getting the children off to school, washing the dishes, or grasping for glamour by identifying with TV heroines.

Vocation — Is the word a synonym for occupation? That work which occupies our time until we can earn security and leisure to begin "really living"? And by the way, what is "really living"?

The great Reformation leaders rediscovered the true meaning of vocation — "the call of God." In Luther's words: "Every Christian is called to serve Jesus Christ in his work and station."

John Calvin urged his followers as they built a purer Christianity: "The Lord commands every one of us, in all the actions of life, to regard his vocation every individual's line of life therefore, is a post assigned him by the Lord, that he may not wander about in uncertainty all his days."

For Calvin "vocation" meant the total claim of the living Lord upon a man's daily life, upon his every moment and every action. Yet, until recent years, there has been little religious motivation in career choice and daily work.

Today, many Protestant denominations have revived the doctrine of Christian vocation as it applies to daily work. So the Annual Emphasis in our Church for 1962 bids us – "Answer God's Call Through Your Daily Work."

This is the triumphant challenge to know life as it should be, meaningful and whole. This is our summons to live every moment — at work, at play, at study — dedicated to God revealed in the Christ. This makes the total difference for the meaning of life work and life itself.



DEPENDENCE DAY?

This week our nation will mark the annual observance of July 4, Independence Day, and this entire month our Presbyterian Church, U.S., will be studying our responsibilities and rights in Christian Citizenship.
