## The Sermon

Minister: Let us, in common with our brethren the people called Methodists in every land, now dedicate ourselves afresh to the service of Almighty God.

All: Almighty God, who didst raise up Thy servants John and Charles Wesley to proclaim anew the gift of redemption and the life of holiness, be with us their children, and revive Thy work among us; that inspired by the same faith, and upheld by the same grace in word and sacrament, we and all Thy people may be made one in the unity of Thy church on earth, even as in heaven we are made one in Thee, Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

RESOLUTION OF THE EIGHTH WORLD METHODIST COUNCIL:

"This World Methodist Council, meeting at Oxford in 1951, commends to the Methodist people everywhere the annual observance of Aldersgate Sunday (the Sunday falling upon or immediately preceding Wesley Day, 24th May) as an occasion for remembering the faith of our founders and for rededicating ourselves in universal fellowship to the spreading of scriptural holiness throughout the world."

Beloved, now are we the children of God, and it doth not yet appear what Minister:

We know that we shall be like Him, for we shall see Him as He is. People:

All: Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Ghost, as it was

in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.

Minister: Let us pray.

Then shall the Minister lead the congregation in extempore prayer: or the

Minister: Let us give thanks to God for our Methodist forefathers.

Eternal God, we give Thee humble and hearty thanks for Thy servants All: John and Charles Wesley, and for all those human instruments through whom Thou didst lead them into Thy saving truth. We thank Thee for the power of their preaching, the challenge of their dedicated lives, and the continued inspiration of their hymns. We praise Thy holy name for

the multitude of those in many lands who through their ministry have believed on the Lord Iesus Christ. Grant that we their children may prove worthy of the glorious heritage bequeathed to us. Through Jesus

Christ our Lord. Amen.

Minister: Let us pray for the people called Methodists throughout the world.

O Lord God, who didst reveal Thy salvation to our fathers and didst strengthen them to proclaim Thy word to the uttermost parts of the

earth, we pray Thy blessing upon the people called Methodists in every land. Grant that, their wisdom and faith being deepened in mutual understanding and fellowship, they may be enabled to obey Thy call to spread scriptural holiness throughout the world, ever praising Thee for what Thou hast wrought, Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Let us ask God's forgiveness for the sins which have marred our witness

Our Heavenly Father, Who by Thy love hast made us, and through Thy All: love hast kept us, and in Thy love wouldst make us perfect, we humbly confess that we have not loved Thee with all our heart and soul and mind

Charles Wesley

Minister: Let us now recall the experience which in the providence of God called into being the Methodist Church, as it is recorded for us in the Journal of John Wesley for 24th May, 1738.

> "By the Grace of God I resolved to seek faith unto the end, by absolutely renouncing all dependence, in whole or in part, upon my own works of righteousness [and] by adding to the constant use of all the other means of grace continual prayer for this very thing, justifying faith; a full reliance on the blood of Christ shed for me; a trust in Him as my Christ, as my sole justification, sanctification, and redemption.

> "I continued thus to seek it . . . till Wednesday, May 24th. I think it was about five this morning that I opened my Testament on those words: 'There are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises, even that ve should be partakers of the divine nature.' Just as I went out, I opened it again on those words, 'Thou art not far from the kingdom of God.' In the afternoon I was asked to go to St. Paul's. The anthem was, 'Out of the deep have I called unto Thee, O Lord ... '

> "In the evening I went very unwillingly to a society in Aldersgate Street, where one was reading Luther's preface to the Epistle to the Romans. About a quarter before nine, while he was describing the change which God works in the heart through faith in Christ, I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone for salvation; and an assurance was given me that He had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death."

> On this momentous day Charles Wesley was an invalid in the house of John Bray in Little Britain, also in Aldersgate Street. He was a triumphant invalid, however, for three days earlier, on Whitsunday, 21st May, he himself had entered into the joy of salvation, and had written one of his earliest hymns under the inspiration of this experience. In his Journal for 24th May he wrote: "Towards ten, my brother was brought in triumph by a troop of our friends, and declared, 'I believe!' We sang the hymn with great joy, and parted with prayer.'

1 WHERE shall my wondering soul begin? How shall I all to heaven aspire? A slave redeemed from death and sin, A brand plucked from eternal fire, How shall I equal triumphs raise, Or sing my great Deliverer's praise?

2 O how shall I the goodness tell, Father, which Thou to me hast showed? That I, a child of wrath and hell, I should be called a child of God, Should know, should feel my sins forgiven,
