JOHN CENNICK (1718-55) A HANDLIST OF HIS WRITINGS

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The basic material for this publication appeared in successive issues of the *Proceedings of the Wesley Historical Society*, volume XXX (1955-6).

The discovery of new and important Cennick holdings has led to numerous additions and some revision, particularly in Section III. The author will be glad to hear from those who are able to add any further details to this handlist.

JOHN CENNICK (1718-55): A HANDLIST OF HIS WRITINGS

JOHN CENNICK was born at Reading on 12th December 1718 into a family of Quakers turned Anglican. Throughout a stormy adolescence he could not escape the demands of a somewhat severe Old Testament Jehovah, and his work as carpenter or land-surveyor never fully engaged his mind. For a time he contemplated entering a monastery. He impoverished himself with almsgiving, restricted his diet to dry bread and potatoes, even to acorns and grass. At length, on 6th September 1737, he found spiritual peace in an Anglican service at St. Laurence's, Reading, and wrote: "My heart danced for joy, and my dying soul revived. I heard the voice of Jesus saying, 'I am thy salvation!' I no more groaned under the weight of sin. The fear of hell was taken away, and being sensible that Christ loved me, and died for me, I rejoiced in God my Saviour."

Soon the young man was in the thick of the incipient Methodist revival. Early in 1738 he went to Oxford to meet George White-field, at whose suggestion the following year Cennick was appointed the first master at John Wesley's newly-erected Kingswood School. At Kingswood, on 14th June 1739, Cennick preached his first sermon, under a sycamore tree. Wesley accepted his labours as a lay preacher many months before he did those of Thomas Maxfield in London, yet he never quite regarded him as one of his "sons in the gospel", and gave the title of first full-time Methodist lay preacher to Maxfield.

As Cennick matured it became obvious that in theological views as well as in temperament he belonged more to Whitefield than to Wesley. After unhappy months of tension and controversy, in February 1741 he and his fellow-rebels at Kingswood were expelled from John Wesley's "United Society". This did not curb his evangelism. In spite of bitter persecution from clergy and mobs, he organized a group of religious societies in Wiltshire, his headquarters being at Kingswood, and later at Tytherton, where in 1742 he bought a house and land. He could not be confined to one area, however, but spent much time in London, where he was associated with Whitefield, with William Cudworth, and with the Moravian leaders Zinzendorf, Böhler, Spangenberg and Hutton. Gradually the Moravians claimed more and more of his sympathy, until in 1745 he handed his Wiltshire societies over to their care. He himself became an official member and minister of their communion during or after a visit to Germany in the spring of 1746.

It was therefore as a Moravian rather than as a Methodist preacher that Cennick visited Ireland in 1746, although the nickname of "Swaddler" which he earned clung to the Methodists also. (Preaching in Dublin at Christmas 1746, he had denounced the adoration of the Virgin Mary, proclaiming: "I curse and blaspheme all the gods

Cennick died on 4th July 1755, and was buried in the Moravian burying-ground in Chelsea, the flat gravestone over his remains reading:

JOHN CENNICK Departed July 4th 1755 Aged 36 Years

* * *

John Cennick's first literary work was published when he was about twenty-one. His active literary life thus spanned little more than fourteen years. During this time he was fully stretched as school-teacher, pioneer evangelist, church-builder, ecclesiastical administrator, and wide-ranging traveller. If he had left a few pamphlets to his name, and perhaps one or two collections of hymns, it would have been as much as could be expected. In actual fact, the British Museum Catalogue lists no fewer than ninety-seven separate editions of fifty-two separate works. My own researches show that this is far from telling the whole story, for the Cennick slips in my Methodist Bibliography files number over three hundred, and it is certain that there are at least a score or two of items which still elude me. A dozen or so of those I list are separate original works not known to the British Museum, or not associated by them with Cennick.

Cennick's output falls fairly naturally into three main groups—hymns, sermons, and miscellaneous writings. Because of the method of their publication the sermons need to be sub-divided into "single sermons" and "collected sermons". Similarly the miscellaneous publications are more conveniently divided into those wholly by Cennick and those to which his contribution was comparatively small. To these are appended a few works about Cennick. Within these sub-divisions the separate works are given in the chronological order of their appearance, the later editions of each being given under the first edition. Where there has been a substantially fresh presentation of old material, or the addition of important new material, a fresh keynumber has been assigned: this applies particularly to the various collected editions of Cennick's sermons.

My hearty thanks are due to the officials of the libraries named below for their very kind co-operation in the search for elusive Cennick material, and to the National Central Library for the information provided from their check-lists. To the Rev. Gomer M. Roberts, M.A. I am indebted for notes from the Weekly History. After each item I have given the symbols denoting in which libraries that item is to be found, and so far as I can tell these location-symbols furnish an exhaustive account of the Cennick holdings of each library at the time of going to print. It may well be that other libraries

can add some details to this list, and any additional information will be welcomed.

I. Hymns

Cennick's first literary production was a volume of hymns, and it is on his hymns that his fame chiefly rests. Largely under the influence of German hymn-writers, he developed a fondness for experimenting with peculiar metres, and seems to have been the means of introducing into this country the metre 8.33.6 in which his well-known "Ere I sleep" is written. He has not the strength of Charles Wesley, and is much more inclined to sentimental banalities. Yet he is often very pleasing, though most of his seven hundred and fifty hymns are now forgotten.

151 hymns, with an alphabetical index at the end. The hymns include the well-known Graces, "Be present at our table, Lord" and "We bless Thee, Lord, for this our Food" (pp. 75, 76), and also "Ere I sleep, for ev'ry Favour" (pp. 78-9).

The lengthy preface is autobiographical, and obviously met with a warm welcome, as may be seen from the following advertisement in the Weekly History for 6th June 1741:

"Lately published, (Price bound Two Shillings). A New Hymn-Book, Written by Mr. Cennick. Sold by the Author's Brother (a Plumber) in Abchurch-lane, near Lombard-street; and by Mr. Cottingham (a Glass-grinder) in Maidenhead-court, Chiswel-Street.

"Note. These Hymns are commonly sung by the Rev. Mr. Whitefield.

"The Preface of this Hymn-book contains an Account of the Conversion and Experience of its Author. In my humble Opinion, the Preface alone is worth above double the Price of the whole Book."

This seems to be practically identical with the first edition, but slight typographical differences (such as some broken lettering on p. 50) suggest that it has been reprinted after an interval. The Weekly History for 19th December 1741 announced its publication "sometime next week", and the issue for 26th December advertised it as "just published". It was not unusual for a book issued during the closing months of a year to bear the date of the following

He was apparently unable to collate the contents, but it seems likely that this is a reprint of 4 and 5, although by that time 6 also was published. It is fairly certain that there were other editions of both 4 and 5, including one of 5 corresponding to 4a, and one of 4 corresponding to 5a.

Undoubtedly 27 of the hymns come from 6, and half of the remainder come from the Moravian Hymn Book of 1742. One is by Watts ("Come, let us join our cheerful songs") and one by John Wesley (his translation from Rothe, "Now I have found the ground wherein "). It seems likely that some if not all of the remainder are original unpublished hymns by Cennick.

Obviously there were earlier editions of this collection, which may be available somewhere. The Rev. Richard Butterworth, in Proceedings, viii, p. 156, speaks of a third edition, S. Powell, 1749; this may be a misprint for fourth edition-or perhaps Butterworth's date should be 1747. Julian's Dictionary of Hymnology, p. 681, claims that "Lo! He comes with clouds descending" appeared "in the fifth (1752) ed. of Cennick's Collection of Sacred Hymns, &c., Dublin, S[amuel] Powell."

Many of the tunes are specially composed for Cennick's various collections. including his Dialogue Hymns. There is an 11-page introduction on the elements of music.

My own copy, which formerly belonged to John Newton the hymn-writer, and contains his autograph, has notes on the authorship of many of the hymns. It assigns 645, 646, 662 and 664 in the 1st Part to Cennick, and in the 2nd

Part 95, 148, 171, 173, 363, 373, 398. Four of these are from published collections of Cennick's hymns, the remainder not, though they are in his style, and almost certainly his. The Preface refers to "recent and wellknown" hymn-writers such as "Dr. Watts, Stennet, Davis, Erskine, Wesley, Cennick,

None of the hymns in the Collection are assigned to their authors. Four of those noted in 11 are reproduced, including one from 1. "Ere I sleep" appears in neither 11 nor 12, although its companion-piece, "Rise, my soul". appears in 11. Neither do Cennick's well-known Graces appear in either

Practically one-half of the section "For Children" (602-35) is adapted from 8, as is also one in the section "Hymns for the Sick"

Under "Moravian Hymnody" Julian's Dictionary notes the later editions of this, which became the standard Moravian Hymn Book:

Manchester, 1801 (revised and enlarged to 1,000 hymns).

II. Sermons: Single

It is difficult to unravel the tangled threads which conceal the pattern of publication followed by Cennick's sermons. Altogether Cennick published thirty-four separate sermons during his lifetime. and these (together with a group of six published shortly after his death) were reprinted both separately and collectively for almost half a century, averaging about six separate editions each. The numbering of these editions is very confusing. For example, Matthew Lewis printed two "Second" editions of at least eighteen sermons: of one sermon there are editions in 1753, 1758 and 1765, then an edition of 1771 numbered "Second" which is followed in 1785 and 1791 by two editions (both published by H. Trapp) numbered "Third". In only twelve out of the forty instances is there a straight run of editions with no such duplications, and it seems likely that some of these may not survive the discovery of still further editions. Altogether I have listed two hundred and thirty-two different editions of the separate sermons, and am quite confident that at least four others were in existence, and in all probability many more.

So far I have come across only three of Cennick's sermons published before 1753—items 17, 18 and 22—although his preface to the first collected edition in that year states that "several of these sermons have been published some years ago". The first was printed

in 1743, editions being extant both by John Lewis of London and Felix Farley of Bristol; the other two were printed in 1744 by John Lewis of London. Shortly before his death Cennick took in hand the systematic publication of his favourite sermons. The actual process of publication is still very obscure. He seems to have put some into the hands of John Hart of London, and then to have transferred his business to Samuel Powell of Dublin. Although Hart prepared at least nine of the separate sermons (seven dated 1753 and two dated 1754), the actual compilation of the collected volumes of sermons seems to have been in the hands of Powell, and Cennick's prefaces to these two volumes were both written in Dublin. In 1754 Powell issued a series of "Seventeen Discourses", and another of "Thirteen Discourses", both of which seem to have been collections embodying separate sermons printed both by himself and Hart, while the "Seventeen Discourses" also included sermons which had been published some years earlier. Powell seems then to have issued another collected edition containing twenty-four sermons, omitting some of the thirty already published, but adding four others. A few months after Cennick's death Matthew Lewis of London seems to have reprinted twenty-two of Powell's twenty-four, and then published a series of six additional sermons never before printed. Later in 1756 Lewis re-published the whole forty sermons which had so far been issued, but re-arranged them in the order of their original delivery. This long continued the basis of Cennick's collected sermons, in two volumes of "Twenty Discourses" each. These volumes retained their format as literary "collected" bundles of separate sermons, and the stock was continually replenished from the offices at No. 1, Paternoster Row, London, which were occupied in turn by Matthew Lewis, H. Trapp, M. Trapp, and V. Griffiths. Eventually they were succeeded by more conventional reprints. which continued well into the second half of the nineteenth century.

Cennick himself aptly characterizes his sermons in the prefaces to the collected volumes which he issued in 1753-4. The preface of 12th December 1753 states that:

The whole Collection are generally Paraphrases and Dissertations on the Miracles and Parables of our Saviour. They are simple and plain, and suited for sincere People, who don't want somewhat curious or diverting, but Salvation:...

In the preface of 9th August 1754, Cennick writes:

I am sensible the Stile, as well as the Matter, will not divert the Curious with good Language; it is not my Gift; nor have I attempted to dress the plain Doctrines of our Saviour. . . . As far as became a Servant of Christ, I have shunned disputable Points, and only published the general and blessed Doctrines of Salvation by Faith in his Name.

Of the forty sermons, only seven are preached from Old Testament texts, and in each case the Old Testament serves as a gateway into the New.

Cennick was a good disciple of Wesley in advocating plain words

for plain people, though he never achieved Wesley's concise vigour. Yet his sermons are scriptural, practical and "homely", even if they are not striking. Ample testimony to their solid worth is afforded by the following proof of their steady purchase by several generations of readers. During the forty years between Cennick's death and the publication of the first separately printed volume of his sermons, although the main batches of single sermons reprinted are concentrated in certain years, only thirteen of the forty years are unrepresented (so far) by one or more reprints. And the following sixty years produced at least seven more or less complete collections of his sermons, to say nothing of selections and reprints in tract form by the Religious Tract Society. Not many sermons are still being bought and read in quantity a century after their author's death!

"Preface. Several of these Sermons have been published some Years ago, and our Saviour has blessed them in the World; may he do the same by the others which are now or may be added to them . . . I am in him, your willing Brother and Servant, John Cennick. Dublin, December 12th, 1753."

The volume in the Reading Public Library which contains these apparently unique "preliminaries" is itself a composite volume containing all forty of Cennick's sermons, but using 53 and 54 as the basic collections. It may be assumed that the seventeen items following these preliminaries were originally issued with this title-page and preface, though it is strange that they are so heterogeneous. Three were indeed published "some years ago", viz. 17, 18, 22. Four were published by Hart of London in 1753 and 1754—23, 24, 30, and 42. The remainder were published by Powell, but contain printing signatures showing that they were not intended to be bound up in this order. Either Powell took items from a former Cennick series printed by himself to make up this publication, or (more likely) he published more title-pages than he really needed to use up old stock, and later filled in the gaps from items published for his own collection 55. It is strange, however, that ten of the presumed earlier issues seem to have completely disappeared. The actual items contained in the Reading copy are as follows: 13, 17b, 22, 18, 20, 24, 23, 19, 28, 30, 29, 33, 37, 42, 46, 39, 38.

"Preface to the Reader. These Discourses, as well as the former, were written at different times, when the Matter which they contain was fresh and clear to my Mind. Some indeed were taken down by others at the time of my preaching, but not so accurately that they needed no Correction or Alteration; but the Substance of every Sermon I have retained, and with no other View have I consented to publish them, but to endeavour to spread the Gospel wherever they come, and help to increase the Knowledge of Jesus Christ in the Earth. . . . Into his Hands I give and dedicate this Book; may he give it into their Hands who read it, and bless it to their Hearts. This is the sole Intention and Wish of his poor Servant and Witness, John Cennick. Dublin, August the 9th, 1754."

There follow in the Reading copy items 14, 15, 16, 27, 21, 25, 31, 32, 35, 34, 41, 36, and 43. All had been recently printed, 16, 27, 35, 41, and 43 by Hart, and the remainder by Powell, though once more the signatures of the Powell publications show that they had originally been published in a different order.

55. "[Twenty-four Discourses]". As we have seen, the separately published sermons from Powell's Dublin press included in 53 and 54 are not given in the order in which they were originally intended to be bound together. In preparing the gatherings of two or four leaves which were to make up a complete pamphlet John Hart adopted the normal principle for preparing independent publications, adding the signature "A" to the first gathering, "B" to the second, and so on. This is true of all the Cennick discourses which he printed. In the case of the Powell publications, however, they were printed as a series. Thus "The Cries of the Son of God", No. 1 in the Seventeen Discourses, was signed "Ff" and "Gg", and "Naaman Cleansed", No. 2 in the same collection, was signed
"N". Obviously no printer would use such a succession of signatures if he intended them to be bound in that order, and the inference is that they were not originally intended for that position. In the case of "Naaman Cleansed" we have evidence that there were at least two earlier editions, which were apparently not to hand when the Reading copy was made up by the binder. It is possible that there were earlier editions of the other eighteen items whose earliest known edition is the one printed in 1754 by Powell, with a signature suggesting that it was prepared for a different publication.

This volume of discourses prepared by Powell has not yet been seen, but we can be fairly certain of its contents and their order by arranging the signatures in order, from "A" and "B" for "The Fall and Redemption" to "Qq" and "Rr" for "Patterns of Mercy". Powell's basic unit was eight leaves or sixteen pages ("A8"), and he then used the following letter for either another full gathering, half a gathering, or even a quarter of one, but then discarded that letter, so that although forming a definite sequence the pamphlets were independent units. Thus item 14 was signed "H8, I2", and item 31 followed on with "K8, L4, M2", and then 17 with "N8". A similar procedure was followed in the compilation of some volumes of the sermons of George Whitefield.

It is thus possible to reconstruct with some accuracy the volume which Powell prepared at Cennick's behest, though the investigation is complicated by the fact that "A" comes twice. Fortunately the fact that 32 is signed "A8, B4" and 28 is signed "Bb8, Cc4" shows that the other "A8" (item 15) should really be "Aa8". One signature has so far not been found, "C8", but it seems likely that this was one of the two other early-printed items, 18 or 22 (both of which had 16 pages), which have apparently not survived in their Powell dress.

In addition to a selection from the sermons published in the Seventeen Discourses and Thirteen Discourses, Powell added four which do not appear to have been published previously, though at least one had been preached almost a decade earlier—items 26, 40, 44, and 45.

From the evidence of the signatures, which may yet be confirmed by the discovery of a title-page, this volume contained the following items, in the order given: 32, (? 18 or 22), 19, 33, 20, 14, 31, 17, 46, 21, 25, 36, 34, 15, 28, 37, 13, 38, 39, 29, 26, 40, 44, and 45.

55a. After Cennick's death Matthew Lewis of London seems to have taken this collection of Powell's and re-printed it, in most cases using in his imprint the formula "Dublin Printed; London Reprinted", and calling his 1756 re-issue "Second Edition". In addition to the normal printer's signatures (an independent series for each pamphlet) he added to most items a key-number, showing that they formed part of a series. The numbers "3" to "22" are extant for Lewis's 1756" Second Editions", and these numbers are absolutely confined to Powell's "twenty-four", not straying at all into the items in the "seventeen" and the "thirteen" not used in the "twenty-four". We may take it, therefore, that Lewis's reprints were based on Powell's series, and that they probably contained two items without a key-number after "22", as surely they contained two items without a key-number before "3".

Lewis, however, completely altered the order of the "twenty-four". His series (omitting the hypothetical "1", "2", "23" and "24") ran as follows: 31, 21, 37, 33, 40, 20, 36, 39, 19, 15, 38, 44, 45, 13, 29, 25, 26, 28, 34, 14. Other items which were almost certainly included were 32 and 46, which both appear in Powell's "twenty-four" and are known in a Lewis second edition of 1756. Another likely item is 17c, which with 18 or 22 would complete the series, if indeed Lewis's volume was identical in contents with Powell's.

56. "[Six Sermons]". Having reprinted most of the Cennick discourses already published, Matthew Lewis published (apparently for the first time) a series of six which Cennick had preached during the last few months of his life—items 47-52. (It seems possible that the date "1744" in item 47 should really be "1754".) Although each was complete in itself and could readily be detached from its fellows, the signatures and the serial numbers show that they were printed as a unity, though so far no title-page for the little volume has come to light.

This series was reprinted by Lewis in 1765 and 1772, by H. Trapp in 1786, and still later without imprint, as may be seen from the entries under the single sermons.

Having added his own quota of six to the published sermons of John Cennick, Matthew Lewis immediately set about re-publishing the whole forty, in two volumes containing twenty each. He subjected them to yet another re-arrangement, this time based on the chronological order of their delivery. This order became the standard for all subsequent editions, and is that adopted in our "Handlist". Thus this volume contains items 13-32, in that order.

Actually no title-page and preface for the 1756 Vol. I of this series has vet

been seen, and it has been supplied from the 1762 edition, with the alteration of the date.

The copies of the sermons included were, in all probability, basically those printed by Lewis himself, with the key-numbers, the making up of item 55a from these separate pamphlets being speedily forsaken, and the materials being diverted to 57.
