#### Wednesday, October 19

The General Executive Committee of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church was called to order in First Methodist Episcopal Church, Tulsa Oklahoma, at nine A.M., Wednesday, October 19, Mrs. Thomas Nicholson, president, in the chair.

The devotional service was conducted by Mrs. Flora S. Dudley.

The secretary called the roll and fifty-four responded. It was voted that Mrs. W. D. Gilliland be seated in place of Mrs. W. D. Shellabear, New England Branch, and that Mrs. J. M. Avann be seated in place of Mrs. F. U. Doubleday, Northwestern Branch.

The report of the ad interin actions of the General Officers was read by the secretary and they were confirmed.\*

The report of the ad interim and the current unit meetings was read.

It was voted that in view of the interpretation of the foreign student act given by President Hoover, the three recommendations pertaining to the work of the World Citizenship Committee be recommitted to the Home Department and if found advisable brought to a unit meeting before the General Executive Committee shall take final action regarding them.

With this exception the actions of the unit meetings were confirmed.† Mrs. Lewis L. Townley, secretary of the Foreign Department, read the report of the ad interim actions of the Foreign Department. It was voted to confirm the actions reported.‡

The committee on memorials reported a memorial submitted by Baltimore

Branch as follows:

We, the members of Baltimore Branch of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society assembled in its sixty-first annual meeting, hereby memorialize the General Executive Committee to create another form of membership to be known as the perpetual membership. Any person or group of persons seeking to perpetuate the name of an individual may do so upon the payment of thirty dollars, and the money so contributed shall be held by the Branch treasurer in which said gift occurs and invested by her; the interest each year to be credited to the auxiliary to which the said member belongs, thereby carrying her name on their rolls for all time.

The committee recommended non-concurrence, suggesting, however, that if any Branch wishes to accept money for membership of this kind, permission be granted, such funds to be handled by the Branch treasurer. *It was voted* that the report of the committee be accepted.

It was voted that two persons be appointed by the chairman who, acting with the nominating committee, should make recommendations to the General Executive Committee as to the expense involved in sending to New York representatives of the Society to hear the report of the Laymen's Foreign Missions Inquiry and who should propose names of such representatives. The chair appointed Mrs. Diefendorf and Mrs. Lindsay.

It was voted that the same committee should nominate a member who should represent the Society at the meeting of the Board of Foreign Missions on November 17.

The treasurer stated that the report of real estate, title, investments and Retirement Fund would be included in the report of the treasurer.

Mrs. L. L. Townley gave the report of the by-laws committee which was adopted.\*

Mrs. J. D. Bragg, chairman of the committee on state of the society, stated that several questions sent to the committee had been referred to the Departments involved and to the conference with the missionaries and had been discussed and clarified.

Mrs. Charles H. Hardie, reporting for the committee on general office voiced appreciation of the work and service of Miss Amy Lewis, secretary of the general office, and stated that the recommendations of the committee would be brought in the minutes of the Home Department. It was voted that a letter be sent Miss Lewis expressing appreciation of her work and regret that she was not present at the General Executive Committee Meeting. The chair appointed Mrs. Baker to write this letter.

Mrs. Dorr Diefendorf reported for the committee on consultation with the Board of Foreign Missions. The committee had met and considered such subjects as the Manchurian situation, the possible changes in General Conference and Central Conference legislation, as it relates to the Board and Society, the International Department, the possibility of closer co-operation in some stations, correlation as it effects missionary work in the local church and church school and the Melville B. Cox celebration.

After some discussion as to how further co-operation might be secured between the Board and Society on the field, the missionaries were requested to suggest definite points on which such co-operation might be effected.

Mrs. F. F. Lindsay reported for the joint commission with the Woman's Home Missionary Society telling of the growth in co-operation and of the movement known as Fellow Workers for the Truth. There have been received 26,000 names of those who have signed the affirmation. The joint commission recommended two weeks of special prayer, Holy Week and the week preceding General Conference on behalf of that meeting, both of which were observed. It now recommends a plan for Bible study, hymn menorizing and prayer thought for the coming year. It was voted that the commission be continued and that the nominating committee be instructed to submit names of members.

Mrs. C. H. Hardie reported for Library Service. She gave a brief review of the beginnings and development of Library Service, speaking especially of the plan of last year when \$5.00 was offered each station and the selection of books left to their choice. She stated that the recommendations of the committee on Library Service would appear in the Home Department minutes.

The report on Museum was given by Miss Clementina Butler, curator, who told of gifts made to the museum and requested from the missionaries further suitable gifts.

Dr. Chester Miao, chairman of the Christian Educational Association of China, was introduced.

Mrs. F. F. Lindsay reported as advisory member of the World Service Commission.

Mrs. C. R. Havighurst brought the report on curriculum and correlation.

It was voted that the recommendations concerning the correlation of the various agencies of religious education in the local church, adopted by the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society in 1925, be brought to the attention of the midyear meeting and that as they now stand or are restated they be sent to the Board of Education and also to the curriculum committee.

Miss Susan C. Lodge reported for the Federation of Woman's Boards of Foreign Missions and the Central Committee on United Study of Foreign Missions.

Miss Clementina Butler reported for the committee on Christian Literature for Women and Children in Mission Lands.

Mrs. C. C. Peale reported for the Joint Commission on Religious Education. She reviewed the progress of the religious education program in various fields and the contributions of missionaries thereto.

Mrs. J. M. Avann reported for the Methodist Joint Committee on Korea. She stated that the committee is the agency in the United States by which close affiliation is maintained with the Korean Church. The recommendations of this committee were brought to the mid-year meeting, were acted upon there and were reported in the Foreign Department minutes.

The reports of standing committees, special committees and representa-

tives on Boards and Committees were adopted.

The report of the Committee on Christian Higher Education in India given by Mrs. Dorr Diefendorf was referred to the Foreign Department for consideration and action.

The report of the Committee on Christian Colleges in China submitted

by Mrs. F. J. McConnell was also referred to the Foreign Department for con-

sideration and action.

The Melville B. Cox celebration was reported by Mrs. H. E. Woolever. Mrs. Woolever was appointed to represent the Society at the celebration to be held in Norfolk, Va., October 30-November 1.
Golden Rule Week was presented by Mrs. F. H. Sheets. The recom-

mendations for its observance appear in the Home Department minutes.

The Barbara Heck Bicentennial was presented by Mrs. H. E. Woolever. The Circle of Remembrance was reported by Miss Effie A. Merrill who stated that there are now 120 members of this circle.

It was voted that following the General Executive Committee Meeting in Tulsa, Mrs. G. W. Isham be regretfully released from the editorship of *The Executive Daily* which she has held since 1911 but that she be asked to continue to prepare the Study in the *Friend*. Mrs. Nicholson expressed the appreciation of the Society for Mrs. Isham's long and efficient service and presented her with a Chinese luncheon cloth, the loving gift of her friends in the Society.

Further actions taken during the public program are as follows:

The committee on the representation of the Society at the meeting which is to consider the report of the Laymen's Foreign Missions Inquiry, reported as follows:

We recommend that the personnel of the representation shall consist of twenty women, seven to have their expenses paid and thirteen without expense to the Society; that the expense connected with this representation be kept as low as possible, that in view of the fact that the president of the Society will be the guest of the commission we estimate the cost of the proposed representation will approximate \$375.00. We further recommend that these expenses be paid by the general treasurer from home

administration fund.

The recommendations were adopted and the following names were presented by Mrs. Frank A. Horne, chairman of the nominating committee: With expenses paid, Mrs. Charles L. Mead, Mrs. F. F. Lindsay (alternate, Mrs. F. H. Sheets), Mrs. H. E. Woolever, Miss Annie G. Bailey, Miss Mary E. Shannon, Miss Bertha F. Starkey, Miss Annie M. Pittman. Without expenses, Mrs. Thomas Nicholson, Mrs. Dorr Diefendorf, Mrs. F. J. McConnell, Miss Florence Hooper, Mrs. C. H. Hardie, Miss Ella M. Watson, Mrs. C. M. McConnell, Mrs. E. L. Harvey, Mrs. C. C. Peale, Miss Clementina Butler, Mrs. Carl F. New, Miss Carol Chen and Mrs. F. A. Horne.

It was voted that greetings be sent Mrs. Otilia P. Riley, the mother of Mrs. Nicholson, who in 1884 at the first meeting of Topeka Branch reported she had organized an auxiliary in the church she and her husband were serving, Solomon's City, and had secured as members every woman in the church but one.

It was voted that the reports of the editors, Miss Effie A. Merrill, Mrs. James H. Lewis, Miss Amalie M. Achard and Mrs. George W. Isham and the report of the publisher, Miss Annie G. Bailey, be accepted.

It was voted that the report of the World Citizenship Committee given by

Mrs. Flora S. Dudley be accepted.

It was voted to adopt the resolution prepared by the committee appointed in the unit meeting expressing the purpose of the Society to oppose every attempt to weaken prohibition legislation and to stand unswervingly for more honest and efficient enforcement of the law as the only satisfactory way toward the permanent solution of the liquor problem and that this resolution be sent to the President of the United States, to the Attorney General and to the chief of the law enforcement bureau.

It was voted that a committee be appointed to send a message of commendation to the woman's magazines that have remained loyal to the eighteenth amendment and a message of protest to the magazines that are wavering. The chair appointed Mrs. Flora S. Dudley, Mrs. Carl F. New and Mrs. W. C.

It was voted that greeting be sent to the units affiliated through the International Department. Mrs. Elisa S. de Pascoe of Mexico was asked to deliver these greetings to Mexico in person.

The annual report of the secretary, Mrs. Harry Earl Woolever was

accepted.

The annual report of the treasurer, Miss Florence Hooper, was accepted. All appropriations have been paid in full. There is no indebtedness to banks, or individuals. The deficits of 1930-31 have been cleared and the net overdraft due from Branches to the general treasurer amount to \$116,250.00, only \$36,000 more than the overdrafts twelve months ago.

There has been a decline of 18.8% in the total collections. The fact, however, that the foreign exchanges, in which our bills must be paid, have been greatly in our favor, has made it possible to bridge the gap of \$392,-000.00 created by lessened receipts and to pay missionaries, national workers and current work appropriations in full at the agreed rate of exchange.

For new buildings, major repairs and miscellaneous non-recurring

items, the treasurer has received during the year, \$125,107.16.

New annuity gifts received by the treasurer, but not included in receipts, total \$15,403.95. The invested funds of the Society amounted on October 1, 1932, to \$2,045,763.00, which is \$139,000.00 less than a year ago because amounts invested for certain building projects have been released to meet construction costs. All investments have been made under the direction of a committee on investments, carefully chosen by the General Executive Committee. Net realized loss on all investments today is 1% of the total cost of securities owned October 1, 1931. All bonds purchased are AA or AAA and legal in New York, New Jersey or Massachusetts. On two \$500.00 bonds received as legacies and on 25 railroad bonds purchased, the income is in default. There have been no other defaults in income. The investment position of the Society is thoroughly sound. Securities owned are classified roughly as follows:

The Retirement Fund endowment amounts to \$955,661.09, a very slight increase over last year, since our plan has been to hold the endowment at its present figure until financial conditions improve. From the income on this endowment, \$45,166.93 has been paid as retirement allowances to almost one hundred missionaries not now in active service because of health conditions or advancing years. The retirement care of missionaries now on the field and to be retired in later years is provided for by the pension policy plan under which, since 1927, when it was started, \$277,-968.42 has been paid in premiums to three of the best insurance companies in the United States.

The cost of operating the Society, exclusive of Branch and conference expense, has been \$38,688.02, a decrease of almost 12% from similar costs in 1930-31. It is impossible at this time for the general treasurer to report accurately Branch and conference expense which do not appear in here.

accounts.

The budget for 1933 can be no larger than the total of appropriations pledged by the eleven Branches, plus approximately \$80,000.00 received from income on endowments and special items. On this basis, the total to be appropriated for the ensuing current year will be approximately \$1,850,000.00. This is a decrease of 15% from the appropriations of 1932, and necessitates, of course, a material readjustment in the entire budget. It means a reduction of appropriation for missionary support and travel from \$677,798.00 to approximately \$554,574.00; of the appropriation for current work on the field from \$1,153,724.00 to approximately \$981,000.00; of the appropriation on building from \$86,503.00 to \$69,185.00; the exchange loss reserves are omitted for 1933 as they will amost surely not be needed. Allowances for retired missionaries are not reduced. Administrative expense appropriation is materially cut.

The invitation of Northwestern Branch to hold the General Executive Committee Meeting of 1933 in First Church, Evanston, was accepted with thanks.

It was voted that Mrs. Dorr Diefendorf should represent the Society at the meeting of the Board of Foreign Missions on November 17.

It was voted that the following statement submitted by the special committee appointed be published in the Executive Daily, marked copies to be sent

to the women's magazines by the publisher.

To Women's Publications: The General Executive Committee of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church in session at Tulsa, Oklahoma, representing more than 400,000 women and girls, went on record October 21, 1932, expressing the desire that the women's magazines shall not offend the moral sense of Christian people, particularly of women who have the welfare of children at heart by advocating the weakening of the defense against the return of liquor by repeal of the eighteenth amendment.

## ACTIONS OF GENERAL OFFICERS

Ad Interim, 1931-1932

Acting under authority conferred upon them by the by-laws of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church, the general officers of the said Society *voted*:

To refer to the president of the Society the recommendation adopted by the General Executive Committee regarding General Conference Legislation on the Central Conference and ask her to direct the recommendation into the proper channel to receive consideration by the General Conference. (See pages 15 and 16, 1931 Year Book.)

To recommend to General Conference that the last sentence in chapter 8, section 110, paragraph 15 in the 1928 Discipline be changed as follows: Omit the two words "wherever practicable" so that it shall read, "Representatives of the auxiliary of the Woman's Foreign and Woman's Home Missionary Societies shall be members of this committee."

To underwrite for the Society \$200 toward the expenses of Mrs. Chitambar while in America.

To give an honorarium of \$15.00 each to Bishop Ryang and Mrs. Chitambar in consideration of their services on the occasion of the anniversary program of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society; the amount given to Mrs. Chitambar to apply on the sum underwritten by the Society toward her expenses while in this country.

To approve of the participation of the Society in Golden Rule Week, December 11–18, 1932, as outlined by Mr. Vickery of the Golden Rule Foundation.

To authorize and direct Evelyn Riley Nicholson, president, and Eloise A. Woolever, recording secretary of the said Society, to execute a deed conveying all right, title and interest of the said Society in and to the property known as 4233 Meridian Avenue, Seattle, Washington, said interest having been acquired by the said Society under the will of Mary L. Downie, deceased, late of Seattle, Washington.

To authorize and direct Evelyn Riley Nicholson, president of the said Society and Eloise A. Woolever, recording secretary, to execute a quitclaim deed to Eleanor M. Dowd of the Village of Wolcott in the County of Wayne, State of New York, remising, releasing and quitclaiming unto Miss Eleanor M. Dowd all that tract or parcel of land situate in the Town of Huron, County of Wayne and State of New York, bounded and described as follows:

# ACTIONS OF THE GENERAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE TAKEN ON RECOMMENDATION OF THE UNIT MEETING

# Ad Interim

It was voted: That a cable of congratulation be sent from the Society to Iai Jo Gakko, Hakodate, which is celebrating its fiftieth anniversary this year.

That as a Society we participate in the commission on organized work of women in the Church, provided the General Conference continue this commission.

That Mrs. H. B. Earheart be appointed as the representative of the Society to attend the funeral services of Mrs. Joseph N. Reed and that the recording secretary and the secretaries of the two Departments send a message of sympathy to the family.

# Annual Meeting, 1932 International Department

It was voted: That the ad interim report of the committee on International Department be accepted and that the recommendations be adopted as follows:

That letters be sent at once to the leaders of organized units asking them to name from the General Conference delegates or visitors, someone, preferably a woman, who may be summoned to a meeting to consider the advisability at this time of the formation of an International Fellowship of Methodist Women and who shall have authority to represent them.

That the expenses of the International Department tea, held on May 7, at which one hundred and twenty were present, fifteen nationalities being

represented, be paid out of the Department funds.

That inasmuch as Mrs. K. A. Wenzel, who is general treasurer of the Central Europe Unit, made a valuable contribution both in the anniversary program and in the work of the Department she be given \$25 toward her expenses.

That a grant of \$200 be given Mrs. Miller for promotional activities and literature with the request that she subsidize Mrs. Rodriguez to the extent of \$100. (Later note: At Bishop Miller's suggestion the \$100 subsidy for Mrs. Rodriguez was sent to the treasurer, Mrs. S. P. Maddock, by Miss Hooper.)
That a grant of \$25 be given Italy for literature supplies.
That a meeting be held on May 14, in the Hotel Dennis to which the representatives of the various units be invited to consider the further steps to

be taken in the development of a world association of Methodist women. The agenda for this meeting was drawn up as follows: (1) A historical statement of the aims and present status of the International Department and (2) Discussion by the nationals based on the following questions:

1. Shall we continue the work of the International Department on the

present basis?

2. Is the time ripe for a formal organization of a world federation of

Methodist women?

The concensus of opinion of the committee on International Department was that in view of the present economic conditions around the world it was not a strategic time to launch the world organization. (Later note: At the meeting held on May 14 the advisability of launching an international association of Methodist women was discussed and the following action was taken.

It was voted that the work of the International Department be continued on the present basis for the time being looking toward a world federation when possible. In the meantime, the countries yet unorganized and desiring to affiliate should develop national units as soon as possible. Because of internal conditions and extent of territory in China and India, it was agreed that affiliation might be by conference. It was voted also, that each unit should have an international committee which should be the medium of contact between the various units.)

That the demonstration written by Mrs. Chitambar be duplicated and copies sent to each affiliated unit. A statement concerning the reasons for

writing and the effect of its presentation should be added.

That a representative of the Mexican Unit be invited to attend the General Executive Committee Meeting in October, 1932, that she be given a place on the program and that \$50.00 be granted toward her expenses.

That a copy of the Woman's Missionary Friend be sent to each of the national units at the expense of the Department unless otherwise provided for. That copies of Fellow Workers for the Truth be sent to each unit as soon

as a further issue is published.

That samples of literature wisely chosen be sent to each national unit. That inasmuch as Mrs. John L. Nuelsen will accompany her husband to

the Bulgarian Conference and will visit so far as possible the auxiliaries of the missionary society, she be allowed \$50.00 toward her expenses while itinerating.

That the subsidy (\$300) granted to the corresponding secretary of the Scandinavian Unit and the literature grant of \$200 less 15% be continued this year.\*

That an additional \$50.00 be given Mrs. J. N. Pascoe for her expenses incurred in attending the General Executive Committee Meeting.\*

#### Miscellaneous

That the nominating committee after consultation with the officers and secretaries nominate carefully selected representatives, a few at least with expenses paid, to attend the meeting to be held in New York, November 18 and 19 when the report of the Laymen's Foreign Missions Inquiry is to be made.

That provision be made for one delegate to go to the Foreign Missions Conference with expenses paid and the list be completed with delegates with-

out expenses.

That at the mid-year meeting, the Home and Foreign Departments meet on the same day and with the understanding that the first session be a unit meeting at which the report of the treasurer, the surveys of the foreign field, the reports of the home base secretaries and other matters of interest to both departments shall be considered.

That inasmuch as Mrs. Hardie who has represented the Society on the Committee of International Agricultural Missions is compelled to resign, the

appointment of Miss Jean Cochrane to this position be ratified.

That the recommendation of the Home Department be adopted to refer the following memorial submitted by New York Branch to the committee on the state of the Society who shall coopt representatives from other Branches and report at the mid-year meeting.

Whereas: The question of changing the date of the Branch annual meet-

ings and the General Executive Committee Meetings from fall to spring has been considered before in the Home Department of the Woman's Foreign

Missionary Society and

Whereas: If the General Executive Committee after deliberation deems this a feasible plan for the several Branches to adopt, and would consider 1932-1933 an auspicious time to institute such a change:

\*Action taken by General Executive Committee but placed here for convenience in reference.

Then, be it resolved: That New York Branch desires to hold its annual meeting in the month of April, closing its fiscal year on March 31st.

That the recommendation of the Home Department be adopted that a committee be appointed to formulate a resolution which shall be sent to the President expressing the conviction of the Society against the return of light wines and beer by modification of the Volstead Act and urging him to veto any action favoring such change.

That the same committee draft and send to President Hoover a resolution expressing the deep and serious concern of the General Executive Committee representing 300,000 voting women of the Methodist Church regarding the present unemployment situation. They urge that the President shall continue an even more constructive effort to meet this immediate and imperative need.

That the foregoing committee be asked to submit a resolution protesting against Secretary of Labor Doak's ruling prohibiting foreign students from obtaining employment to help meet their educational expenses.

Moved that the home base and corresponding secretaries prepare a list of leading Methodist women in their territories to be sent to Dr. John R. Edwards to assist in the set up of the educational and promotional campaign of the Board of Foreign Missions.

*Voted:* That the foregoing resolution be referred to the Departments with the understanding that if there is not concurrence it be brought back to the unit meeting.

# Reduction of Year Book

That the report of the committee appointed to bring in suggestions as to the reduction of the size of the year book be accepted and reductions authorized as follows:

In Proceedings omit all comments on the program, the recording secretary's report and report of resolutions committee. Summarize the treasurer's report. Omit the reports of the corresponding secretaries, reports of union colleges, the statement concerning the McDowell Fellowship Fund and the report of Christian Literature for Women and Children in Mission Fields. Omit report of Home Base Activities, reports of departments, German Work Swedish Work, the Woman's Missionary Friend, Junior Missionary Friend, Frauen Missions Freund, Central Committee on United Study of Foreign Missions, Federation of Woman's Boards of Foreign Missions, General Office and Library Service. Omit directory of missionaries, reporting only changes. Omit constitution and by-laws, questions for missionary applicants and miscellany.

# ACTIONS OF THE GENERAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE TAKEN ON RECOMMENDATION OF THE HOME DEPARTMENT

#### Ad Interim

It was voted that the plans as presented in the Annual Message and the Blue Print be approved.

That the hotel bill of Mrs. Isham's assistant at Tulsa be paid from the

general treasury.

To distribute to the members of General Conference the *Friend*, the *Junior Friend* and two leaflets—"I Will March with the Rest" and "I Wonder Why"—and to distribute them Wednesday morning at the entrance to the Auditorium.

That the quadrennial leaflet report be sent for free distribution to the Branches.

That the Wesleyan Service Guild continue the support of Mabel Nowlin in China for the next three years.

That, inasmuch as, according to the new plan, financial askings go to the units only through the conference and district secretaries, we impress upon these secretaries the importance of giving prompt attention to this matter, advising name of treasurer to whom money is to go; also that units should not be asked to use auxiliary devices as their own are prepared by the central committee.

That the central committee notify secretaries of the home base of the location of new units with name and address of president that same may be welcomed and cultivated.

That we comply with the following request which comes from the central committee:—"That the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society handle the Wesleyan Service Guild supplies at their depots of supplies and distributing offices. That a reasonable commission be given to these offices for the handling and sale of Wesleyan Service Guild supplies and that settlement be made monthly or quarterly as agreed upon. That the literature of the Wesleyan Service Guild be included wherever the literature of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society is displayed."

To approve the sending of the Journal of Religious Education by the units of the Wesleyan Service Guild to our stations on the field.

That Mrs. LeSourd be asked to visit colleges in the neighborhood of Tulsa instead of using expense money upon special student features in connection with the meeting of the General Executive Committee.

That the plans for the student department for next year be approved, including the publishing of an new budget of leaflets partly in common with the young people's department, a revised Chinese program; and having a foreign student center chairman in various college centers throughout the country.

That we take definite steps to co-operate with the Board of Education of the Methodist Episcopal Church in order that a foreign missionary leadership course may be incorporated in the Board's leadership courses.

That we make one of the courses of the leadership training series as the third term of our Missionary Workers Training Course.

That the home base secretaries arrange for the payment of bills for leaflet on vocational choices and that the bill be prorated to the Branches on the regular percentage basis.

That we remind the Branches that this year the young people's super-

intendents are to attend General Executive at Branch expense.

That, if after investigation it is found feasible, in order that the young people's superintendents may come to General Executive at less expense to the Branches, all missionaries coming to the General Executive be instructed to use their clergy permits to a city determined by the respective Branches; then purchase a ticket with a certificate to Tulsa.

That Miss Bailey send the Blue Print to Standard Bearer missionaries.

That the stewardship posters which were sent to Atlantic City for exhibit be sent to Tulsa for the General Executive, expense to be borne by the general

That Follow Workers for the Truth, as recommended

That Fellow-Workers for the Truth, as recommended by the Forward Movement Committee, be promoted by the stewardship department.

That Mrs. Waterman be asked to edit the stewardship column in the

Friend for the coming year.

That the Joint Commission with the Woman's Home Missionary Society be asked to plan a program of Bible reading, intercessory prayer and hymn memorization which shall be published in the stewardship column.

That the use of the stewardship colors and candles be continued.

That, inasmuch as the church in general is not using the stewardship card, we recommend the use of the threefold card of our Society.

That we recommend that "It Is to Share" be kept before the constituency as a stewardship textbook and that "Tellable Tales" be used by the auxiliaries for stewardship illustrations.

That a demonstration for the extension department be published.

That Miss Bailey be requested to prepare a number of brief leaflets for

That the slogan for the coming year be—"No falling stars."

That a leaflet for the Negro constituency be published for the coming year. That Mrs. Hardie prepare a message from the foreign field and Mrs. Lindsay one from the home base for this leaflet.

That Mrs. Camphor, Mrs. Clair and Mrs. Tyler be asked to co-operate in preparing a page for the Friend in the number that features the Melville

Cox Memorial.

That the communication received concerning conference arrangements involving race groups be passed from entertaining Branch to entertaining Branch that the Branches may do their best to carry out the suggestions contained in it.

That \$100 be paid from the museum fund treasury by Miss Lulie Hooper. the treasurer of this fund, for janitor service at the museum and \$7.50 for

expressage.

That Mrs. Sheets be authorized to certify that Mrs. New in the absence of Miss Lulie Hooper from the country is authorized to substitute for Miss

Hooper in the administration of the museum fund.

In view of the fact that tuition in the Woman's Medical College of Pennsylvania has increased from \$250 to \$400 a year, we recommend that an effort be made to increase the Clara Swain Endowment Fund from \$5000 to \$8000 and toward the attainment of this sum we recommend that the amount now in the treasury of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society which was an over and above from the \$5000 originally needed for an endowment be transferred from the treasury of the Society to the Clara Swain Endowment held by the Corporation of the Woman's Medical College of Pennsylvania.

That we regretfully release Mrs. G. W. Isham from the editorship of *The Executive Daily* after the next General Executive Committee meeting at Tulsa, but ask her to continue the preparation of the Study in the Friend.

That the world map which was used at the Anniversary at Columbus be

given to Boston University.

# Annual Meeting, 1932

Literature. We nominate Miss Effie A. Merrill as Editor of the Woman's Missionary Friend with a salary of \$1800 and an office budget of \$989; Miss A. M. Achard as Editor of Frauen Missions Freund with a salary of \$475; Mrs. James H. Lewis as Editor of the Junior Missionary Friend with a salary of \$600; Miss A. G. Bailey as Publisher and Editor of Literature with a salary of \$2400; Mr. George E. Whitaker as auditor of publisher's accounts and Miss Bailey as publisher of *The Executive Daily*.

That a grant of \$225 be made to Mrs. G. W. Isham for work in connection

with the Friend and for research.

That one copy of *The Executive Daily* be sent to each mission station and that a copy be given to each missionary present at the General Executive meeting.

That the leaflet report be published, number to be ordered by the home

base secretaries.

That we recommend that district secretaries stress the importance of The Executive Daily by including it among the items to be taken up at the September meeting of auxiliaries when subscriptions should be solicited.

That our history be printed in 1934-35. That in 1933-34 an order slip be

printed and sent to each auxiliary, telling of our history and also of the text-

book on Japan, as that year of study will be the 60th Anniversary of the founding of our work in both Japan and South America.

That Mrs. Isham with additional help prepare a "How to Use" on the history to be included in the budget and that Miss Lodge be requested to notify the Central Committee on the United Study of Foreign Missions that we shall not need so many textbooks as usual in 1934–35.

That Mrs. F. T. Enderis be nominated as Editor of *The Executive Daily* for 1933 with an allowance of \$50.

That the return expenses of Miss Heacock, Mrs. Isham's assistant, by train from this meeting be paid from the general treasury.

That there be no publicity through periodicals as to programs for union societies already existing in the junior or young people's societies or the auxiliaries, but that information be sent through the respective Branch secretaries.

In event there should be a request for more copies of the union auxiliary program that, as it is so late in the year, additional copies be made on the mimeograph and not printed.

That junior programs be handled by the Branch superintendents through the publisher's office.

That auxiliary and junior programs be supplied without charge and the young people's for five or ten cents each, depending on the cost.

Young People's Work. To nominate Mrs. J. C. Shover as secretary of the young people's department with a budget of \$500.

That in view of the fact that the young people's department of the Woman's Home Missionary Society has accepted the foreign outline and wishes to fill in the home society plans, we recommend that Mrs. Shover be authorized to consult with Miss Miller and proceed to have mimeographed a program for union societies already existing which shall contain both foreign and home outline.

That there shall be a correspondence course on the history and organization of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society which missionaries shall be obliged to pass before they are sent to the field; this course to be under the direction of the secretary of the Society, Mrs. Woolever.

That it be suggested that missionaries spend two or three days with conference and district secretaries and thus become acquainted with these officers and learn their working plans and methods and that before missionaries begin to itinerate they be given an outline of the plans and projects of the different departments of the Society with references where full explanation of these items can be found and also that the missionary be required to read the first two terms of the Missionary Workers Training Course.

That a leaflet, limited to 2,000 words, called "Teen-age Tithers" be printed for use this year and sold at two cents each, Branches to bear any deficit.

Wesleyan Service Guild. To nominate Mrs. M. N. English as secretary of the Wesleyan Service Guild with a budget of \$1,000.

To nominate Mrs. C. N. Timmons as a member of the Central Committee of the Wesleyan Service Guild.

That apportionments to the Wesleyan Service Guild Units be based on the giving of the year previous, in order to reach the guilds by September first of each year. Junior Work. To nominate Mrs. Frank McKibben as secretary of junior work with a budget of \$175.

That the attention of the auxiliaries be called to the action taken at General Conference that there should be a representative from the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society on the Committee on Religious Education in the local church and that the name of this representative be recorded with those of the other officers of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society and the church school. (This name to be sent to the district officers.)

That the column in the Woman's Friend for the junior department be continued.

That the demonstration "Candle Lighting Service", written by Mrs. Havighurst for junior stewardship instruction be widely used.

That the program gotten out by the committee on World Friendship Among Children be approved and that a reasonable amount of publicity be given it in the *Junior Missionary Friend* with the suggestion that it be worked through church schools and a message either through picture or story, relating to Christ, be placed in the Folios to be sent to the children.

That greater effort be made to have the Junior Missionary Friend put into church schools where correlated work is carried on, and that the home

base secretary see that this is done.

To reaffirm our former action that emphasis be placed on the training of young women for leadership in the junior department:—first, by seeking contacts with those who are especially adapted to this work and making it possible for them to attend the junior methods hour at district and Branch meetings. Second, to send such young women to institutes and summer schools where junior leaders are in conference and periods are given for the missionary instruction of juniors. Third, that a short manual for the use of leaders in the groups mentioned be prepared by the general secretary of junior work.

That where junior missionary organizations are correlated with the Sunday schools or junior church there be suitable blanks printed for reporting the work of such organizations to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society;

on this blank the following items to be reported—

1. Number of children receiving missionary education.

Course of study followed.

 What material and devices of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society are used.

4. Amount of money sent to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society

treasurer

What enterprises of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society are supported.

6. Number of subscriptions to the Junior Missionary Friend.

Student Work. To nominate Mrs. H. M. Le Sourd as secretary of student work with a budget of \$1080.

That the demonstration "Graduation Time", written by Miss Helen Magly of Cincinnati Branch, and recommended by Mrs. LeSourd to the student secretaries of the Branches, be put on in each society as part of the auxiliary program.

That each Branch make a list of Methodist students in their midst, of foreign students here for study, of missionaries on furlough, and invite them to meet in small groups with Branch officers, or at least with the Branch corresponding and home base secretaries.

That the flags for the demonstration of the student department be retained by the Society and not sold, expense to be borne by the general treasury. The expense for use each year to be borne by the entertaining Branch.

That the award for increasing the life expectancy of auxiliaries offered by the College Abroad Movement be given at this meeting.

That the effort to increase the life expectancy of auxiliaries be continued another year as a regular part of our promotional work, printing an inexpensive explanatory leaflet, and that the College Abroad Committee be discharged at this time with deep appreciation of the wonderful work they have done both for the field and the home base.

To recommend reconsideration of the action on appropriating to Ewha College the \$1,000 award of the College Abroad Movement given by Mrs. H. B. Earhart, Director of the College Abroad Movement and that it be referred to Pacific Branch in accordance with the offer made at the beginning of the effort for increasing life expectancy.

Stewardship. To recommend that in addition to the stewardship column in the *Friend* the other colmn on the same page be given to Fellow-Workers for the Truth, both to be under the one page heading, Christian Stewardship.

Highly appreciating the devotional outline for Fellow-Workers for the Truth prepared by Mrs. Lindsay and Mrs. DeVinney, we recommend its use by our membership.

To recommend that wherever possible provision be made for the conference and district secretaries of stewardship to attend Branch meetings.

To emphasize the recommendation that stewardship be given recognition on all group, district and conference programs.

To recommend that when a Branch is entertaining General Executive it provide a way for its stewardship secretary to attend the session.

That each auxiliary be urged to purchase at least one copy of "It Is to Share" and use at each meeting one or more stories from it.

That the auxiliaries commend and help promote the stewardship work in the junior and young people's departments.

That the stewardship posters which were exhibited at Atlantic City and sent to Tulsa be judged by the stewardship committee and announcement be made of the four best in order of their excellence; that these posters be taken care of by the home base secretaries.

Miscellaneous. To nominate Miss Susan C. Lodge as Federation representative and also as Methodist member of the Central Committee on the United Study of Foreign Missions.

That it be the duty of the Interdenominational Committee of the Home Department after consultation with the Foreign Department to nominate delegates to the annual meetings of the Foreign Missions Conference and the Federation and to the Conference on the Cause and Cure of War.

That Miss Lodge be our delegate with expenses to the annual meeting of the Federation and that Miss Lodge and Miss Lewis be authorized to secure other representatives without expense.

That Mrs. F. J. McConnell be our delegate with expenses to the Foreign Missions Conference and Miss Susan Lodge, Miss Carrie Purdy and Miss Amy G. Lewis be our delegates without expense, Miss W. H. Dievler to be the alternate.

That Miss Amy G. Lewis be nominated as secretary of the general office with a budget of \$6,800, to include \$200 to the Board of Foreign Missions for medical services.

That the committees (listed on page 8 of this Year Book) be approved.

To nominate Miss A. M. Achard as secretary of German work with an allowance of \$600 and a budget of \$100.

To recommend that the continuance of the Joint Commission of the Woman's Home and Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies be authorized.

That Miss Alice Hazeltine be nominated as director of Library Service

with a budget of \$50.

That Mrs. Mead be made one of our delegates with expenses paid to the meeting for consideration of the report of the Laymen's Foreign Missions Inquiry.

To approve the recommendation of the World Citizenship Committee that we continue to stress the signing of the loyalty pledges at least until

March.

That the following resolution on the World Court be approved: The Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church in executive session at Tulsa, Okla., October 19-24, 1932, renew their previous statement expressing faith in the permanent Court of International Justice at the Hague, as a necessary and worthy instrument of a world peace system. They regret that the delay in acceptance of the Protocols of Accession both deaden interest and strengthen reactionary sentiment. We respectfully urge our Senators to vote for the Protocols of Accession at the earliest possible time in the next session of Congress.

We recommend that this action of the General Executive in behalf of the World Court be transmitted to the Branch presidents of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society to be sent to the United States Senators of the states in

their jurisdiction.

That we participate with the Board of Foreign Missions in the observance of Golden Rule Week with a fifty-fifty division of receipts—50% to be paid to the local treasurer of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, 50% to be paid to the local treasurer of benevolences to be sent to the World Service Treasurer as a designated gift to the Board of Foreign Missions.

That there be an article in the December Friend on the observance of

Golden Rule Week, this article to be prepared by Mrs. Lindsay.

That a uniform statement for Branch papers and The Executive Daily

be prepared on the observance of Golden Rule Week.

To recommend that occasionally district and group meetings be held in zero churches.

That the life of Dr. Ida Kahn, one of our extension missionaries, be used

in one of the suggestion sheets.

That auxiliaries be authorized to place a tiny silver star in the sky of their "Well of Salvation" poster for every extension member held and a gold

star for every new extension member secured.

That a leaflet be printed, prepared by Mrs. Lindsay and Mrs. Hardie, for the negro constituency, that it contain the statistical report of the Negro work for last year and the list of our missionaries in Africa with their stations, the edition to be 2,000 and to be distributed by the secretaries of the Branches having Negro work on the same basis as last year, cost not to exceed five cents each.

To recommend authorizing the general treasurer to pay the bill for \$29.40

for furniture for booth five at General Conference.

That since the world map used at Columbus has been offered to and accepted by Boston University steps be taken to transfer it to their property.

That the other articles used at Columbus and Springfield be taken from Springfield to Boston and stored in the basement of Tremont Street Church.

That banners that can be used by different departments be given to those departments.

That the white satin banner from Crandon Hall Home be sent as an expression of international good will to Crandon Hall in Montevideo, Uruguay.

# ACTIONS OF THE GENERAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE TAKEN ON RECOMMENDATION OF THE FOREIGN DEPARTMENT

The following actions of the Foreign Department taken from the close of the annual meeting of the General Executive Committee, 1931, to the close of the annual meeting, 1932, were reported to the General Executive Committee and confirmed by it:-

It was voted that Miss Florence Hooper, treasurer of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church, be hereby authorized to execute the necessary power or powers of attorney required to consummate the sale of the property on Boulevard Mercier, Constantine, North Africa, now owned by the said Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

That Miss Bess Phillips be appointed treasurer for the South East Africa Conference.

That on her return to the field Miss Glora Wysner become treasurer for North Africa Conference.

# China

That during the second six months of 1932, and the first six months of

933, the special grant of \$400 Mex. on a missionary's salary be continued. That for the second six months of 1932 and the first six months of 1933, a special emergency appropriation be made to each of the China Conferences from Branch exchange gain, equivalent to one-third of the present current work appropriation in Mex. dollars, this appropriation to be used in no case for new projects, but only temporarily to supplement salaries of Nationals and work appropriations of institutions because of extra expense incident to the low price of silver. The distribution shall be made by the Field Reference

Committee of each conference to specific individuals and institutions in a proportion, as nearly as shall seem wise, equivalent to the original appropriation. The funds for these emergency appropriations shall be obtained by the central treasurer for China by charging against the exchange gain of each Branch an amount in Mex. dollars equivalent to one-third of the current work appropriation of the Branch reckoned in Mex. dollars at 2 to 1. Thus if the appropriation is \$2,000 gold (\$4,000 Mex.), the amount charged shall be \$1,333½ Mex.

To continue the contribution of Miss Mabel Nowlin to the China Christian Educational Association as associate secretary until her next furlough,

December, 1933.

To approve the registration of the North China buildings at an approxi-

mate cost of \$10,000 Mex.

That permission be given the Kiangsi Field Reference Committee to sell, if deemed advisable, the property purchased by Dr. Stone for a missionaries' home at Danforth Hospital, Kiukiang, China.

That Pacific Branch be authorized to pay the salary of Frances Milnes,

teacher in Keen School, Tientsin, China, during the school year, 1932.

To approve the constitution of the Woman's College of the West China

Union University as submitted October, 1932.

That we regret that owing to the present financial situation of the Society it is impossible to include in the appropriations an amount for the travel expense of Miss Gertrude Oldroyd, secretary of the China Christian Educational Association.

That Miss Cora Simpson be loaned to the Christian Nurses Association

in China for continued service.

## Europe

That the Foreign Department authorize the sale to M. Henri Coup of Grenoble, France, of a strip of land from the lower end of the garden of the Foyer Retrouve property at La Tronche, said strip approximating  $40 \times 30$  metres and fronting on Petit Chemin de la Pallud, being bounded on its opposite side by the garden of the Foyer and on the third side by the Propriete Hebert, and

That the treasurer of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Miss Florence Hooper, resident of Baltimore, Md., U. S. A., be empowered to issue the necessary power or powers of attorney

to consummate this sale.

That the Foreign Department of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church, acting under authority conferred upon it by the by-laws of the said Society, does hereby authorize and direct Florence Hooper, its treasurer, a resident of Baltimore, Md., U. S. A., to issue to Beredine Krill, a resident of Lovetch, Bulgaria, power or powers of attorney as a true and lawful representative of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society (1) to sell, assign and transfer a certain lot with buildings thereon, situated opposite the Parliament Building in the city of Sofia, Bulgaria, and to give deeds of title therefor, for and in the name of the said Society, (2) to conclude the entire transaction including the receipt of the money for the sale, (3) to change, to return, and to confirm legally all that may be necessary to complete the sale authorized by this instrument in as full and ample a manner as the said Society could itself do if personally present.

That Martha D. Whiteley be appointed treasurer for France. That Mrs. Artele B. Ruese be appointed treasurer for Italy.

#### India

That the All India Literature Committee be the Committee in India on the Zenana Papers, viz., "Woman's Friend," with authority to arrange for editing and publishing the various editions of the paper.

That Miss E. Lahuna Clinton be appointed central treasurer for India of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church. her term of office to begin when Miss Ethel L. Whiting, the present treasurer,

leaves India on furlough.

That on and after the assumption of her duties as central treasurer for India, Miss E. Lahuna Clinton may open accounts in the name of said Society with such banks throughout India as she may deem necessary and expedient, and further that she may authorize any person or persons being missionaries of the said Woman's Foreign Missionary Society to operate such accounts.

To approve the act of incorporation of the Vellore Medical College pro-

vided the words Protestant Evangelical or their equivalent be inserted.

To assent to the proposal of the Queen's Hill School to promote cooperation with other missions, provided such relationship brings about no complications in the administration or property ownership of the school.

To approve the change of name from Queen's Hill School to Mount

Hermon School.

Japan

To approve the organization of a central board in the Japan Methodist Church to be the controlling board financially and otherwise for the women evangelists of the Japan Methodist Church; this board to be formed by representatives from the Japan Methodist Church and the three cooperating missions and the Woman's Missionary Society of the Japan Methodist Church.

In case such a central board is not set up, we hereby express our desire to cooperate with any agency for woman's work that may be set up by the

Japan Methodist Church.

To approve the constitution of Iai Jo Gakko Zaidan Hojin as submitted

at the meeting of May, 1932.

That a copy of the report of the Committee on Higher Education in Japan be sent to each educational station in Japan, the expense to be paid from the General Fund.

To approve the sale of the present site of the Hachimanyato day nursery in Yokohama, the proceeds to apply on the purchase of a new site to be registered in the Japan Methodist Church Zaidan. It is understood that the project is to be entirely financed on the field and that no debt is to be incurred.

To purchase the former German Consulate property at Nagasaki, Japan,

at a cost of \$4,800 gold, and

That Miss Florence Hooper, resident of Baltimore, Md., U. S. A., and treasurer of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church, be empowered to issue power or powers of attorney as shall be needed to complete this purchase.

Korea

To approve the merger of the Union Bible Training School and the Methodist Theological Seminary, Seoul, Korea, and to approve the Constitution of the Methodist Theological Seminary as submitted in May, 1932.

To approve the sale of the Union Bible Training School property if and

when a suitable opportunity occurs.

Malaya

That permission be given for the Malaya Field Reference Committee to sell the Short Street property, Singapore, for at least \$6,000 straits.

To approve the acceptance of land adjacent to our present campus at Kuala Lumpur, Singapore, offered by the Government, this land to be given as a freehold as long as it is needed for educational purposes.

South America

To rescind action taken at Erie, October, 1931, relating to the payment of missionaries' salaries and current work in Peru, and it was voted that missionaries' salaries and current work appropriations in Peru be paid in 1932 and in 1933 at a rate equivalent to Soles 3.47 to one dollar United States currency.

That the Foreign Department extend to July 1, 1933, the action taken at Erie as follows—Because of the increased cost of living resulting from the depreciation of currency of Argentina and Uruguay, that for six months beginning November 1, 1931, a special appropriation be made from gain by exchange to supplement the salary of each of our missionaries and contract teachers in Eastern South America, in proportion to the amount of her salary not being paid in the United States, of 210 pesos per quarter in Argentina and 240 pesos per quarter in Uruguay.

That the general power of attorney for Argentina be transferred to Rhoda C. Edmeston, principal of Institute Modelo, Buenos Aires, and that the treasurer of the Society, Miss Florence Hooper, be authorized to have such power prepared in necessary technical form and forwarded to Miss Edmeston.

That Miss Olive Givin be appointed treasurer for Argentina. That Edith E. Knoles be appointed treasurer for Uruguay.

#### Mexico

It was voted that for the last quarter of 1931 and the first three quarters of 1932 and until further action by the Foreign Department a special emergency appropriation be made to Mexico Conference from Branch exchange gain equivalent to one fourth the present current work appropriation in Mexican dollars, this appropriation to be used in no case for new projects but only temporarily to supplement salaries of nationals and work appropriations of institutions because of extra expense incident to the low price of silver. The distribution shall be made by the Field Reference Committee to specific individuals and institutions in a proportion, as nearly as shall seem wise, equivalent to the original appropriation. The funds for these emergency appropriations shall be obtained by the treasurer for Mexico by charging against the exchange gain of each Branch an amount in Mexican dollars equivalent to one-fourth of the current work appropriations of the Branch reckoned in Mexican dollars at 2 to 1. Thus, if the appropriation is \$2,000 gold (\$4,000 Mex.) the amount charged shall be \$1,000 Mex.

To invite a representative from the Mexico Unit of the International Department to attend the meeting of the General Executive Committee to be held in Tulsa, Oklahoma, October, 1932; and that the International Department contribute to her expresses.

Department contribute to her expenses.

That Philadelphia Branch be permitted to pay the salary of Mrs. Rodgers

while she is substituting for Miss Lauderdale in the industrial schools.

To approve the organization of the company which was formed in July to act as a board of managers, and to hold the equipment for the Sarah L. Keen and the industrial schools in Mexico City; said company composed of the Misses Hooper, Thomas, Taylor, Tovar, Alarcon, and Adela Palacios.

Isabella Thoburn College

Since the government requirement for graduation from Isabella Thoburn College necessitates securing a physics teacher without delay, if such a teacher can be secured and her salary provided on the field, the funds for passage, outfit and furniture grant be met, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors, from profits on bonds and income received on building funds in the treasury for Isabella Thoburn College pending their use on the field.

Inasmuch as the Goucher College girls were asked to name the new science wing because of their gifts to Isabella Thoburn College and they chose the name Goucher College Wing, and inasmuch as the promise had been made that the Hazzard name would be continued in the science wing of the new building, a tablet be placed in the building so worded as to indicate that it replaced by the proposed by the

it replaces Hazzard Memorial, thus perpetuating both names.

Ewha College

To appropriate from the interest on the Ewha College building fund an amount not to exceed 2,800 Yen for the home economics department of Ewha College if the requirement of the government cannot be met in any other way.

Hwa Nan College

To approve the constitution of the Board of Directors of Hwa Nan College.

McDowell Fellowship Fund

That a grant of \$175.00 available in 1933 be given Jovita Tiburcio for study in the Philippines.

That a grant of \$200 be given Miss Carol Chen to cover the expense of

publication of her thesis.

#### THE 1933 BUDGET AND APPROPRIATIONS

The budget for 1933 is a carefully planned combination of financial daring and financial conservatism. Its total is \$156,000 greater than the total collections of the fiscal year which closed October 1, 1932. On that date Branch overdrafts already made against the general treasury of the Society amounted to \$116,000. These must be cared for, if possible, within the year to come. Adding the amounts above noted, it becomes evident that a risk of \$272,000 is involved in the total appropriation of \$1,849,170 voted by the General

Executive Committee for 1933. To cover this risk, an increase in 1933 collections and substantial gains in foreign exchange are imperative.

Even so large a figure as \$1,849,170, however, necessitates a reduction for 1933 of 15% in the current work appropriation of each foreign conference and of 10% in salaries of missionaries on the field and on furlough. The table which follows shows the reduced figures:-
