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
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




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MINUTES

OF THE

CINCINNATI ANNUAL CONFERENCE,

CINCINNATI, OHIO, SEPTEMBER 23, 1854.

BISHOP SCOTT, PRESIDENT. JOHN T. MITCHELL, SECRETARY.

Summary.

THE Cincinnati conference held its third annual session in the

Ninth-street church, Cincinnati, Septembel 27, 1854.

At 9 o'clock, A. M., Bishop Scott called the conference to order, and conducted the religious services, reading the holy Scriptures, singing, and prayer.

The Secretary of the last conference, at the request of the Bishop, called the roll. Of 157 members, only 95 were present the first morning of conference. Some were detained by affliction, and one—Rev. C. G. Meredith—had died during the year. Subsequently nearly all the members of conference were in

attendance.

John T. Mitchell was elected Secretary, James F. Chalfant, Assistant, and Wm. P. Strickland, Official Reporter. Several reporters for the daily papers of the city were present during the session, and were invited to seats within the bar.

The conference met daily at 8 o'clock, A. M., and adjourned at

The President was requested to appoint, at some time during the session, all the Committees of Examination for next year.

Ordered, that Stevens's Church Polity, Peck on Rule of Faith, Hibbard on Baptism, and Tytler's Universal History be studied by the classes the next year.

Brother E. G. Nicholson was recognized as a member of this conference, by transfer from the Western Virginia conference.

The Reports of the Book Committees, and the Exhibits of the Book Concerns, east and west, were read, from which that important interest of the Church is shown to be in a highly-prosperous condition.

In addition to the usual Minute business and the reports of committees, herewith published, the following resolutions of general interest were adopted, on sundry days during the session:

LOCAL PREACHERS.

- 1. Resolved, That local preachers be hereafter required to be examined on the course of study prescribed for them before they be elected to orders by this conference.
- 2. Resolved, That the presiding elder of the district and the preacher in charge of the circuit or station, be a committee to examine local preachers, in each charge, on the course of study.

THE CONFERENCE COLLECTION.

Resolved, That it is the sense of this conference that it is the imperative duty of each preacher in charge of a circuit or station to take up a fifth collection, in obedience to the law of the Church.

CLAIMANTS ON CONFERENCE FUNDS.

WHEREAS, The General conference has granted to the annual conferences authority to discriminate who shall be claimants on the funds of said conference, and the amount each claimant shall receive from year to year; therefore,

Resolved, That this conference, hereafter, in the disposition of

its funds, will act under the discriminating rule.

ESTIMATES FOR NEXT YEAR.

The conference Stewards were appointed a committee to estimate the amount needed the next year to meet the claims of the superannuated and distressed traveling preachers and their families, and the widows and orphan children of the conference, and to apportion the amount among the circuits and stations, and publish the same in the Western Christian Advocate.

VOTE OF THANKS.

Resolved, That the thanks of this conference be tendered to the families where we have been so hospitably entertained, to the pastors of those churches which were occupied by our preachers on the Sabbath, and to the Trustees of this church, in which the conference held its session.

CONFERENCE TRUNK.

Messrs. Moores & Butterfield, No. 89 Main-street, Cincinnati, through brother Fowble, presented to the conference a handsome trunk, worth some \$25, for the use of the Secretary. Whereupon, it was unanimously

ANNUAL MISSIONARY COLLECTION.

The month of May was agreed upon as the time when the annual missionary sermons shall be preached, and the public collections for missions taken within our bounds.

CONGRESS-STREET GERMAN CHURCH.

WHEREAS, The object of the agency for said Church, to which Rev. G. W. Walker was appointed last year, though successfully prosecuted, is not fully accomplished, and,

WHEREAS, The present condition of said agency is such as to

demand the reappointment of brother Walker; therefore,

Resolved, That the Bishop be respectfully requested to appoint brother G. W. Walker to such a position as will enable him to consummate the object of said agency.

TRACT AND COLONIZATION AGENTS.

Resolved, That we will cordially receive and co-operate with

the Agents of the Tract Cause and the Ohio State Colonization Society, whenever they may visit our respective charges.

CONFERENCE SERMON ON MISSIONS.

Brother C. Brooks was appointed to preach the annual sermon on missions, before the conference, in 1855; brother M. Dustin, alternate.

COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

Brothers W. Rowe, H. Baker, Moody, Kemper, Brooks, Armstrong, Helwig, Wydtenbach, and Gahn were appointed to confer with a committee of lay brethren on the financial affairs of the conference.

The session of the conference was protracted somewhat beyond the usual length, and was closed at one o'clock on Friday, October 6th. Much good feeling prevailed throughout, and the bonds of Christian union between brethren were knit more closely. Some most painful duties devolved on the conference; but these were met with a firm and yet tender spirit. Bishop Scott, who was on his first visit to the conference, in his presidency, preaching, and social intercourse, endeared himself to all. Doctors Durbin and J. T. Peck represented the missions and tract interests, with which they are charged, with addresses before the conference and the public in their usual felicitous style; and we were favored with visits from several beloved brethren from other conferences.

The next session is to be held at Urbana, Ohio, September 26, 1855.

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MEMOIR OF REV. CHARLES G. MEREDITH.

Rev. C. G. MEREDITH, son of Samuel and Belinda Meredith, was born in Baltimore county, Maryland, May 5, 1820. He seems to have been remarkable from his childhood for his orderly behavior and sobriety of temper; and at the early age of about eleven years he united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, and soon after professed conversion at a camp meeting held on what was called Low's camp-ground, in the southern part of York county, Penn., and near the Maryland line. Young Meredith was of Methodist stock; his grandparents, as well as his parents, being members of the Church. The following extract from a letter, written by the Rev. Thomas Gorsuch, will convey a just idea of his early piety and promise to the Church: "After his conversion he was a model for all young Christians. He immediately, after joining the Church, commenced speaking in class, love-feast meetings, and His praying and speaking often produced a praying in public. powerful effect on those present, as I now most distinctly recollect. Such was the consistency of his walk, and the depth of his piety and devotion, in connection with his youth, that he became an object of remark among older Christians; and it was frequently predicted, when he was but a boy, that he would some day become a preacher of the Gospel." Brother Meredith was a selfeducated man, was fond of books and of study, and applied himself closely in the acquisition of literary, scientific, and theological knowledge. He read his New Testament in Greek and Latin, was well versed in the English branches, and was one of the best theologians of his age in the conference. In the pulpit he was dignified, instructive, and highly practical. His sermons were carefully prepared, and generally adapted to the occasion; and, bating a slight defect in distinctness of enunciation, were well de-As an administrator of Discipline, he was judicious and safe, being mild but firm. As a pastor he had but few superiors—faithful in his work, and happy in his intercourse with his people and with the community. Not only his late charge, but the Church, must feel his loss.

Brother Meredith was received on trial in what was then the Ohio conference in the autumn of 1846, and appointed to Wilmington circuit, and, the year following, to Monroe circuit, at the close of which he was ordained deacon, and received into full connection with the conference. In 1849 he traveled the Maysville circuit, in Kentucky; and was this year, on the 4th of December, united in marriage to Miss Sarah E. Simmons, daughter of Rev. W. Simmons, of the Cincinnati conference. In 1850 he was ordained elder, and appointed to Augusta circuit, Kentucky. His next field was West White Oak, 1851; Batavia, 1852 and 1853; Lebanon station, 1854, where he closed his life and labors together, July 16, 1854.

His last sickness was sudden, and his death unexpected to him-

self and to his friends, till a few hours before it occurred. any, had fairer promise of long life than he; yet the messenger came, and death took him away—took him away with a brief warning. But as in life, so also in death, he evinced the Christian's spirit and the Christian's hope. The last Sabbath preceding the one on which he died was spent in Wilmington, in exchange with a ministerial brother. He preached three times on that day; and feeling somewhat indisposed, on next day returned home. He was not, however, considered seriously ill by his physician till Friday evening, when it was discovered that his brain was seriously affected, and that probably he could not live. The announcement of this fact to him, however, did not alarm him. It is true that most of the time, from that period till his death, he labored under the influence of delirium, yet he had occasional lucid moments. A minister of a sister denomination visiting him, remarked that in all human probability he must soon leave us, and asked him how he felt in view of such an event. He very calmly replied, "That he had attended to that matter before—that he was ready;" and invited the minister to unite with him in prayer. He also made similar replies and requests to other friends who visited him. Some time after this he called his two little sons, Eddy and Willie, and affectionately embraced them, as though conscious he would soon leave them. Some time after this he remarked, "It will soon be over;" and when his speech failed, and he could no longer give utterance to his thoughts and feelings, he looked as though he would tell his weeping wife and sympathizing charge, "All is well; I'm going home."

Thus sank quietly and peacefully to rest another of God's servants; but he died at his post—died with his armor on. God had

more important work for him in a better world.

"Servant of God, well done!
Thy glorious warfare's past;
The battle's fought, the race is won,
And thou art crowned at last."

REPORT ON COLONIZATION.

The Committee on Colonization beg leave to make the following

report:

Your Committee, we have ascertained, were not desired, by its originators, to consider and promote the interests of the American Colonization Society directly, but to consider the propriety of cooperating with a colonization society for the state of Ohio, and devising the best means for the execution of its designs. This state society is yet to be organized; and it is proposed, through the agency of Mr. Christy, Agent of the American Colonization Society, to organize that society in co-operation with this conference

The great object of this society will be during its present session. to check the extension of slavery, and contribute toward its extirpation by promoting civilization on the coast of Africa. object the society proposes to effect by inducing and assisting the more intelligent free people of color in this country to emigrate to Africa, for the purpose of employing the less intelligent natives of that country in the cultivation of tropical products, thus destroying the slave-labor monopoly over this great source of gain.

This proposition your Committee regard with favor, and recom-

mend a cordial co-operation in the movement for the following

reasons:

1. The undying motive to perpetuate and extend slavery is gain. This vulcan power neutralizes the force of moral considerations. Slave labor is chiefly rendered profitable by the great demand of tropical products, in the cultivation of which slaves can be most successfully employed. Tropical products are supposed, at this time, to supply the basis of nearly three-fourths of the commerce of the Christian world. Slavery enjoys the monopoly of producing and receiving the profits of this vast commerce. We must deprive and receiving the profits of this vast commerce. slevery of this vital stimulus. To create competition on the coast of Africa in the cultivation of these products, as the fruit of free labor, will contribute to this end. This is practicable. More than 640,000 acres in a climate adapted to tropical cultivation on the coast of Africa may be consecrated to free labor. This territory was recently purchased by benevolent gentlemen of this country, and given to the republic of Liberia, from which, thank God! slavery is forever excluded by its Constitution. This ground may be bought for a very small consideration per acre of the Government, and a hundred and sixty acres given to every family who will emigrate to that country; and it is the proposition of this society to procure the means that will enable them to hold out such inducements to the free people of color in this state.

2. Another very weighty consideration that should prompt us to destroy the monopoly of slavery in tropical cultivations, is, to prevent the permanent establishment of a huge system of slavery on the continent of Africa. Eight-tenths of the savage population of that continent have always been in a state of servitude. Since the suppression of the slave-trade, the despotic chiefs have employed the slaves, who they otherwise would have sold, in the cultivation of tropical products. This renders slaves valuable, and, of course, prompts the chiefs to extend and perpetuate the system of crush-We must break the chains of slavery by making ing bondage.

slave labor unprofitable.

3. Another circumstance commending the proposition under consideration to our favorable notice, is, the effect it must have upon slavery in this country. It is to add strength, respectability, and importance to a republic whose Constitution frowns upon and prohibits slavery forever within its jurisdiction. Any thing that we can do for the promotion of this free nation must weaken the chains of their brethren in this country—an object dear to every Christian heart.

Your Committee submit the following resolutions for adoption:

- 1. Resolved, That we approve the proposition to organize a colonization society for the state of Ohio.
- 2. Resolved, That we will cordially co-operate in carrying out the designs of this society.
- 3. Resolved, That we recommend the appointment of an efficient man from our conference to act as agent of this organization, if such be organized, and the appointment be requested.

REPORT ON PROPLE OF COLOR AMONG US.

The committee appointed at the Cincinnati conference of 1853, "to inquire and report to the next session of the conference what can best be done to promote the welfare of the people of color

among us," present the following:

Your Committee are fully aware that the subject referred to them for consideration and report is one of incalculable importance What can best be done to promote the and of general interest. welfare of the people of color among us? is indeed a great question. We give no countenance to any theory which goes to deprive the black man of his full share in our common humanity, but hail him as a man and a brother in accordance with that grand affirmation of the Bible, which must forever settle the unity of the human race, that God "hath made of one blood all nations of men for to dwell on all the face of the earth." Hence, we cordially concede our obligation to do good to the colored race according to our ability and their necessity, as members of the wide-spread family of man. Here, then, is an extensive field open for benevolent enterprise, where a part of the large donations of the rich and the smaller contributions of those of less ability may advantageously mingle together; and where the patriot, the statesman, and the philanthropist of every description may unite in the accomplishment of a noble work of charity and labor of love.

Your Committee propose making an effort to collect and concentrate various influences and appliances, which may be successful in raising the colored people among us from their degradation, and restore them from their depressed and outcast condition to confidence and usefulness in the world. In this god like work of philanthropy we conceive the Church of Christ, in all her branches, loudly called upon to make the most direct, persevering, and efficient to possible to recent this neglected portion of our popu-

lation from ignorance and vice; and we doubt not if the various denominations of Protestant Churches will take the lead in this important work, that statesmen and legislators will be active collaborers in this noble enterprise of mercy. School-houses are almost unknown among the colored people of our country, and they now seem left to educate themselves as best they may. We propose to call forth an influence that will secure to them at least a good common-school education, which will greatly improve their condition.

The Legislature of Ohio passed an act to provide for the reorganization, supervision, and maintenance of common schools, which, though imperfect, is an honor to our state. The eighth section of the school law provides for the enumeration of all the unmarried white and colored youth, noting them separately, between the ages of five and twenty-one years, resident within each subdistrict, designating between male and female, and requires a return of a certified copy thereof to be made to the township clerk.

The thirty-first section of said law says: "The township boards of education in this state, in their respective townships, and the several other boards of education, and the trustees, visitors, and directors of schools, or other officers, having authority in the premises of each city, or incorporated village, shall be, and they are hereby, authorized and required to establish, within their respective jurisdictions, one or more separate schools for colored children, when the whole number, by enumeration, exceeds thirty, so as to afford them, as far as practicable, under all the circumstances, the advantages and privileges of a common school education; and all such schools, so established for colored children, shall be under the control and management of the board of education, or other school officers, who have in charge the educational interests of the other schools; but in case the average number of colored children in attendence shall be less than fifteen for any one month, it shall be the duty of said board of education, or other school officers, to discontinue said school, or schools, for any period not exceeding six months at any one time; and if the number of colored children shall be less than fifteen, the directors shall reserve the money raised on the number of said colored children; and the money so reserved, shall be appropriated for the education of such colored children, under the direction of the township board.'

As it is common for the colored people to associate together, and settle in neighborhoods, it is probable in most places where there are any, that their unmarried youth and children from five to twenty-one years of age will reach thirty in the enumeration, and that the average attendance at school in the sub-district will not likely fall below fifteen; so that the school law of Ohio makes provision to secure to the colored youth of our state a common school education; and we appeal to all our citizens, and to the tax-payers in particular, to combine their influence to carry out the provisions of the law in this respect. This benevolent effort should be made

under the pure and benign principle of love for mankind; but if this motive should fail to influence, the consideration should prevail that their elevation, by being thus educated, will be a greater advantage to the community than all the expense of their tuition, so that the tax-payer may realize a net pecuniary profit; and the same is true in relation to all other portions of our population who are illiterate and vicious. They are among us, and it will be to our own interest to promote their intelligence and virtue, and, by so far, remove their ignorance and vice by securing to them a common school education.

Your Committee further propose to call special attention to the necessity of furnishing this portion of our population with the means of religious instruction. This we deem essential to their elevation in the scale of being, as well as their moral improvement and final salvation. We are aware there are very few colored people immediately connected with us in Church fellowship; some associate with various Baptist Churches, but the most of them, who have united with any Christian people, belong to the African Methodist Episcopal Church, which was formed principally out of secessions from our Church in Philadelphia, Baltimore, and some other places, under the influence of several distinguished colored ministers, among whom was Rev. Richard Allen, who was ordained by Bishop Asbury in 1799. In 1816 the organization of the Church was completed, and Richard Allen was consecrated to the episcopal office. There has been a great increase in the membership of this Church, and they now have societies and congregations formed in nearly every free state in the Union, and many in Canada. They perfectly agree with us in doctrine, and in nearly all respects their Church government and discipline are the same. Many of them once belonged to our communion, and we are nearer to them than any other denomination. We may, therefore, hope to have access to their councils and congregations for consultation, and may mature the best plans for the moral culture and religious instruction of the colored people generally, which both Churches, with other influences added, may successfully carry out. Your Committee, therefore, recommend a more confidential fraternization and closer communion of our Church with the African Methodist Episcopal Church than has heretofore existed, that we may unite our wisdom in devising and our influence in executing the best means for the intellectual and moral improvement of the We might perhaps include some of their destitute colored race. neighborhoods in our domestic missions, or we might sustain with funds trustworthy colored preachers, to carry to such destitute settlements the Gospel of Christ, and labor for their salvation. We recommend that our ministers avail themselves of all opportunities which may be presented of preaching to them, and in every possible way encourage their ministry and membership to build up a holy people, who may exert great moral power over the colored race, and be the means of rescuing many of them from sin and

ignorance in this life, and of securing their happy destiny in eternity. We only add that the colored people in our midst ought to be advised, and, if possible, influenced to organize Sunday schools wherever ten of their children can be collected together, and teachers procured; and, if need be, let white persons volunteer to become teachers, that their rising generation may be taught the fear of the Lord, and how to serve him while young, and be reared for God and heaven. Every effort which may be made to suppress evil in children, and plant in their tender hearts the seeds of grace, is certainly well directed, and cannot fail, with God's blessing, to be crowned with signal and lasting success. Let us labor to get the children saved! Colored people are in great danger of infidelity. The white infidel will use most skillfully many circumstances connected with their history to poison their minds, and influence them to reject the religion of the Bible. How cruel must he be to rob the black man of nearly all that comforts him in time, and which opens to his enraptured vision a blessed immortality, and the just rewards of eternity! Let us labor to guard the colored race from the ruinous principles of infidelity, and strive to counteract the influence of the ingenious infidel, by teaching them all to read, and then supplying them with good books; especially let us give them all the Bible, which will form a steadfast anchor for their souls. They are also in danger of being drawn aside by the pompous displays and numerous appliances of the Romish hierarchy; and when they acquire property, special and strong efforts may be made by an ingenious priesthood to proselyte them. them be educated and thoroughly instructed in God's revelation to man as found in the Bible, and they will be safe from this error.

Your Committee recommend the establishment of one literary institution of a high order in the west for the more effectual training of colored men for distinguished usefulness, but especially to prepare a sufficient number of teachers, male and female, to supply their schools with competent and well-trained instructors wherever colored teachers may be needed. There is a great lack of wellqualified ministers and teachers among the colored people; and we can think of no better plan than this to supply the lamentable deficiency. It is probable the number of colored people in our midst will greatly increase; hence the greater necessity of increasing the number of intelligent and pious ministers and teachers, to educate and train the race in a proper manner. Moreover, whenever they will cheerfully volunteer their services, not otherwise, we need many educated and holy men and women to send back to the father-land, to strengthen the young republic and co-operate with our successful mission conference in Liberia in Christianizing the heathen of that dark land, and in spreading abroad throughout that whole continent the principles of our holy Christianity, with all its lovely and happy fruits, among which we doubt not will be found civil and religious liberty.

Should the colored men of the United States and Canada, in

favor of emigrating to another country, make a location in Central America or the West Indies, as intimated at a recent convention held in Cleveland, composed of about one hundred and forty delegates, there will be much necessity for learned men, including ministers of religion and professional teachers, to accompany the colonists to their new home, and aid in its improvement. This project, however, we think, can not succeed, as comparatively few will consent to emigrate to a Catholic country.

The culture and conversion of the African race can never be universally accomplished by the direct instrumentality of the white race. The colored man must, for the most part, be the minister, the educator, and leader of his own race. We would, therefore, recommend that we educate and thoroughly instruct the present generation, that they may be prepared to educate and Christianias

all the generations to come.

Your Committee recommend the appointment of a General: Agent. If a suitable minister can be procured, who shall have

charge and special supervision of this work, we suggest:

That he make an effort to form an intimate acquaintance with all those ecclesiastical bodies and Churches in the west who have colored persons in their communion, seek opportunities to preach te them, and, in such form as his prudence may dictate, explain to their conferences, and, if it be thought proper, to their congregations, our design to elevate the colored race among us, by increasing their educational facilities, and laboring to advance their. intellectual and moral improvement. He should consult with them in regard to the best plan of accomplishing this work, and ask their aid and influence to encourage and support him in his labor, or propose to assist them in theirs.

2. That he co-operate with the Government authorities in securing the erection of suitable school-houses, and in opening and sustaining good schools, under competent instructors, for the

colored children.

3. To organize Sunday schools with the consent and aid of the people, and circulate tracts and useful books for their instruction and salvation.

4. That he lecture occasionally on appropriate and useful subjects, as well as preach the Gospel wherever he can procure a congregation, and endeavor to diffuse abroad among the colored people the spirit of enterprise, industry, frugality and economy. He should try to excite them to master the mechanic arts, to qualify themselves to manage the more lucrative branches of business, and fit up for themselves neat, convenient, and healthy: dwellings.

5. That he visit other Churches as opportunity offers, and endeavor to elicit a sympathy and awaken an interest in behalf of the colored people, that they may be generally cared for, and that their moral culture, their religious instruction, as well as their

intellectual improvement, may be accomplished.

We suggest, also, that he ascertain what may be considered the mest favorable site or location for the contemplated literary institution, and what may be the prospect for raising funds to endow such an institution of learning.

With our report we submit to the conference the following reso-

lutions:

1. Resolved, That it is of the greatest importance, both to the colored and white races in the free states, that all the colored people should receive at least a good common school education; and that for this purpose well-qualified teachers are indispensable.

2. Resolved, That the religious instruction of the colored people

is necessary to their elevation as well as their salvation.

3. Resolved, That we recommend the establishment of a literary institution of a high order for the education of the colored people generally, and for the purpose of preparing teachers of all grades to labor in the work of educating the colored people in our country and elsewhere.

4. Resolved, That we recommend that an attempt be made, on the part of the Methodist Episcopal Church, to co-operate with the

African Methodist Episcopal Church in promoting the intellectual and religious improvement of the colored people.

5. Resolved, That we recommend, as soon as practicable, the appointment of a General Agent, to carry out the objects proposed in the preceding resolutions, and to labor otherwise for the improvement of the people of color.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT ON SLAVERY.

The committee appointed to consider the subject of slavery have performed the duty assigned them, and respectfully submit the

following report:

In regard to slavery, as practiced in these United States, we can not better express our views, than in the language of the fathers at the conference of 1785. That language is as follows: "We do hold in the deepest abhorrence the practice of slavery; and shall not cease to seek its destruction by all wise and prudent means." And your Committee cannot but regard it as an enormous wrong, which of course Christianity is designed to destroy. The Church of Christ, we have no doubt, should take and maintain toward this; practice a position of open and avowed hostility, and should boldly proclaim her determination to labor with untiring perseverance for its atter extirpation.

And this position has been taken by our Church. The end at which she aims is clearly stated; and now the inquiry is, "What shall be done" for the attainment of this end? It may just as well be understood by all whom it may concern, whether south or north, whether friend or foe, that whatever measures may be taken, or however those measures may be varied, this one object will be kept steadily in view, and that the Methodist Episcopal Church will never cease to seek the extirpation of this evil, till the last manacle is broken off and the last slave is free.

Up to this point there seems no room for difference among us. But when we proceed a step farther, and inquire how this object may be most certainly and speedily accomplished, there is ground for diversity of sentiment. And when we recollect that the wisest heads and purest hearts have been sorely puzzled by this inquiry, we feel that we should approach it with becoming modesty. At the Christmas conference, held in 1784, it seemed quite clear to our fathers of that period, that all slaveholders should be excluded from the Church; and a rule to that effect was accord-Six months' observation and reflection, however, ingly enacted. awakened doubts in their minds; and the rule was first suspended for a time, and finally abandoned. Whether they acted wisely or unwisely in this retrograde movement, let the past and future history of the Church determine.

For fifty years the standing inquiry of the Church has been, What shall be done? and practically the answer has been, Nothing. For it can not be denied, that instead of any thing toward the extirpation of this evil being effected by the Church, slavery has made large encroachments upon the Church and upon the country: At first it humbly asked for toleration, and this was granted. It then demanded the sanction of the Church, and has obtained it. Finally, it coveted more territory, and took possession of it. Last year we complained of a most iniquitous law, enacted for the purpose of compelling us to catch our brother as he fled from the oppressor, and send him back to his unrequited toil, to his worse than Egyptian bondage. This year another and a bolder step is taken; and vast regions of territory, heretofore considered sacred to liberty, have been thrown open to slavery.

And now the question again comes up, "What shall be done for the extirpation of the evil of slavery?"

Your Committee would respectfully recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That we earnestly recommend our people to memorialize Congress, asking the repeal of the Fugitive-Slave law, and the re-enactment of so much of the late law known as the Missouri Compromise as excluded slavery from Kansas and Nebraska and other tel

E. Resolved, That persons holding slaves for gain, or for their ewn convenience in any way, or with the intention of perpetuating the bondage of the slave, should not be received into the Methodist Episcopal Church, nor suffered to continue therein.

REPORT ON JOINT COMMITTEE OF FINANCE.

The committee appointed to consider the propriety of introducing a lay element into our deliberations on financial subjects, reports as follows:

Your Committee can see no well-grounded objection to the reposition. As a doctrine it does not clash the provisions of the Discipline as they now are; and as a plan of operation we think it simple and every way practicable. The proposition is not a nov-elty in Methodism. The measure has been adopted and acted upon by the Wesleyan connection in England for many years, and by some conferences in the United States. The result attained wherever the experiment has been tried, we believe has been invariably beneficial. And as our benevolent enterprises are numerous, and are rapidly multiplying on our hands, and as they all require material aid, which must be chiefly supplied by the laity, it is their due, and only respectful on our part, to invite them to participate. But the most influential consideration requiring the adoption of this To accomplish this measure is the improvement of our finances. object we think it vastly important to draw the membership into the closest possible union with the ministry, that their hearts may pulsate in unison with our own, and so to identify them with our enevolent operations that they will feel that these enterprises are the enterprises of the people.

Your Committee submit the following resolutions for adoption:

1. Resolved, That we recommend the appointment of a financial committee by the conference, at its present session, consisting of as many members as there are districts within our bounds, to conferwith an equal number of laymen.

2. Resolved, That we recommend the district stewards to appoint one steward from each district to attend the session of our confer-

ence, to confer with the members of the financial committee ap-

REPORT OF THE TRACT AGENT.

It is, doubtless, expected that we report to the conference our operations in the tract cause the past year. At the close of the North Ohio conference, a year ago, the idea of this agency had not once entered our mind; and when suggested by others was not seriously entertained till recommended by the Ohio and Cincinnati conferences. As it required the concurrence of those conferences with the action of ours in the appointment of a joint agency, and as it was several weeks after the close of the North Ohio conference before they met and acted in the case, it was nearly the middle of October before we received the appointment.

We had, then, before the work could be entered upon, to call separate meetings of the board of managers of the several conferences included in the agency, to receive instructions and the plan of operations.

These arrangements, with other contingencies, necessarily consumed considerable time, so that it was December before we could enter regularly upon the work. True, during the interval we visited a number of points, and did some little for the advancement of the cause. Having made the necessary arrangements, we commenced the work according to the direction of the Boards of Managers, intending to devote our entire time and best efforts to the cause.

For several months we prosecuted the labor with as much success as could reasonably be expected under the circumstances. But

early in March we were attacked with inflammation of the lungs, and an affection of the throat and head, by which we were prontrated and rendered unable to pursue the work for nearly six weeks. This affliction deranged all our plans of operation. Being deeply anxious, however, as we have always been, to do, to the best of our ability, the work assigned us by the Church, we resumed the labor with health but partially restored, and dragged on, in the best way we could, till about the middle of July, when we were attacked with chills and fever, and have been able to do but very little business of any kind since.

We entered upon this agency with no very sanguine hopes of immediate success, but with a sincere desire to become practically acquainted, as far as possible, with the operations of our new tract enterprise, and to increase and extend the usefulness and power of the Methodist press. It was soon found, however, as we had anticipated, that the field was entirely too large for one man. he should attempt to pass over the whole ground, it must be done so hastily as scarcely to make an impression any where; and if he should confine himself chiefly to any particular portion, he would give occasion of complaints from other parts of the work. Another and very great drawback was, that, in the judgment of the friends of the cause generally, the mere circulation of tracts, however important that may be in itself, does not fully meet the expectations of the Church, or the wants of the people. The general impression is, that the new tract organization would provide a regular and efficient system for the more general and extensive circulation of the literature of our Church, by colporteurs or district agents; but as the traveling preachers are the principal agents for the sale of our books, and as the conferences had not authorized any change, we did not feel at liberty to employ any other agencies, except at a few points where the preachers desired it; consequently, the best we could do in meeting this difficulty, was to inform the people what we hoped to do in the future; namely, to include in our operations the general circulation of all the publications of our Church.

The evident effect, however, of this state of the case was, and still is, to induce the people to suspend any very efficient effort for the tract cause merely, till our plans are completed, and our operations embrace the whole work as contemplated above.

Whether these expectations shall in any degree be met, or any change in the mode of circulating our books be made, depends on the action of the conference. And we will not conceal our convictions, that unless the conference authorizes and adopts measures to establish a regular system throughout its bounds for the circulation of our books, according to public expectation, the tract cause, for the mere circulation of tracts proper, will not be sustained to the extent anticipated by most of its friends. To establish such a system, it will be necessary for the conference not only officially to authorize a system of colportage within its bounds, but also to appoint an agent for this conference alone, who shall, with the

counsel and direction of the Board of Managers, have the supervision of the whole work, and through whom the district agents shall transact all their business with the Book Concern. And to avoid embarrassment and secure success, there should be a permanent fund raised, by which the conference agent can furnish all his colporteurs with books at cash rates, and without any risk to the Book Concern; the proceeds of the sales replenishing and perpetuating this fund.

Such a system, if there should be no more books sold under it than on the present plan, would have the advantage of extending the circulation of our religious literature among thousands of families who have never been reached but to a very limited extent, if

at all, by the publications of our Church.

Should the conference adopt some such plan as here suggested, we have no doubt the agent, with the co-operation of the preachers, could raise the funds, including the profits on the sale of books, necessary to sustain a colporteur in each presiding elder's district in the conference—and more should the work require it—without diminishing the amount that would ordinarily be contributed for the tract cause.

There are many who would give from five to one hundred dollars to sustain a system of this kind, who will give but little or nothing for the tract cause merely. But we did not intend to discuss the subject in this report, and possibly these remarks may be considered out of place. In conclusion, without going into particulars, we will only say, that we have labored the past year, in this agency, to the full extent of our health and strength, and we feel now, that in not a few instances, even beyond what prudence would have dictated. And, although the results may fall far below the expectations of those who have not given careful attention to the subject, we will greatly rejoice in the success of any one who will do more under the same circumstances.

Such publications are almost indispensable in arousing the energies of the soul, and in exciting the mind to vigorous and healthy action. It is impossible to place too high an estimate upon that which tends to the true elevation of the mind, enkindling holy aspirations for happiness on earth and for the bliss and joys of eternal life. We desire to express, in part, the solicitude and sincerity of our feelings by invoking, as far as possible, that kind of conference action the result of which will be neither contingent or remote, but energetic, immediate and effectual.

1. Resolved, That the Bishop be, and is hereby requested to appoint a competent man to act as agent for the tract cause within our bounds.

2. Resolved, That in relation to this subject, this conference be regarded as a tract association, with power to order, advise, and aid in any arrangements extending or conveying our tract publications to all the people within our bounds.

3. Resolved, That the Tract Agent for this conference, together with all subordinate officers, have the privilege to circulate among

the people within their respective fields of labor.

4. Resolved, That as members of this conference, and friends of the common cause of education and religion, we will cheerfully co-operate with and aid, as far as practicable, those who may be employed in this work.

5. Resolved, That annual collections shall be taken up in each society to aid in carrying out the interests and operations of the tract cause, and that the presiding elders of the several districts

be requested to call the attention of each quarterly conference to this subject.

REPORT ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

The Committee on the Sabbath School Cause present the fol-

lowing report:

We are as much as ever convinced of the importance of the Sabbath school enterprise; and see growing inducements to patient, persevering effort in this department. As our fields of labor become circumscribed and our opportunities for aggressive movements lessened, we feel the importance, nay, the necessity, of cultivating well every part of the field already under our care. In communities where preaching has long been established, the chief source of increase in the Church must be found in the children of our families.

Again: in destitute neighborhoods the seeds of truth may be sown in young hearts in the Sabbath school, at an expense of labor and means probably much smaller, in proportion to results, than through any other mode of Christian effort. And while we encourage earnest effort to aggregate to our communion largely from the world, we would urge upon our ministry, and parents, and members of the Church, that they remember the statutes of the Lord, and the doctrines and usages of the Church of their choice, and teach them diligently unto their children as God commanded Israel: "And these words which I command thee this day shall be in thine heart; and thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and thou shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up."

The statistics show, in some departments, a growing interest in the enterprise. The number of conversions reported show, conclusively, that God has set his seal of approbation upon the efforts of our Sabbath School Union. In many of the new schools, as well as the old, the Church has been reaping a harvest of young

hearts converted to God, which is full of promise to the cause of

Him who says to us, "Feed my lambs."

Yet there is much to be done. In many places such is the indifference of our members that Sabbath sabole if organized at

difference of our members, that Sabbath schools, if organized at all, are only organized to languish and die for the want of competent, pious, faithful teachers; and that, too, where talent and piety are rusting in the Church for want of activity. Many of our schools are suspended half the year, and that, too, during the winter months, when the day schools are most flourishing. This difficulty in some localities, perhaps, cannot be avoided; but in many places it can and ought. We respectfully urge the conference and laity to discountenance this practice, and to endeavor to continue our

Sabbath schools through summer and winter.

The plan of having some definite object of benevolence before the school, wherever tried, has worked admirably. In this work a double benefit is realized: first, the contribution secured; and, second, the far greater one of training the children to habits of benevolence.

As the permanence and success of our Sabbath school enterprise is so inwoven with the objects of our Sabbath School Union, we urge the importance of furnishing material aid, by collections, on all cur charges. A small sum from each, to aid in forming new and sustaining feeble schools, will add greatly to its efficiency. As shown by the circular, our own conference has received, in grants from the treasury of the Union, but about one-sixth of the amount contributed; but many places in the newer conferences have been opportunely assisted. Many portions of our work very much need the aid which the Union, if properly sustained, will be able to furnish; and our efforts should be cheerfully put forth to accomplish

this result.

We offer, for the adoption of the conference, the following resolutions:

- 1. Resolved, That we realize the growing importance of the Sabbath school enterprise; and that increased exertions are called for on the part of the ministry and membership of our Church.
- 2. Resolved, That we earnestly recommend that schools be organised in every neighborhood in our bounds, and that we discountenance the practice of discontinuing the Sabbath school during the winter months.
- 3. Resolved, That we recommend that some benevolent object be constantly kept before each school for its contribution.
- 4. Resolved, That collections be taken up in all our charges for the Sabbath School Union.

OAKLAND FEMALE SEMINARY.

It is proposed to merge the Oakland Female Seminary into a female college of the first order, which will be under the control and supervision of the Cincinnati conference.

1. Resolved, That we request the Bishop to re-appoint the Rev. Joseph M'D. Mathews as Principal of the Oakland Female Seminary.

2. Resolved, That the presiding elder of Hillsboro district, the preacher in charge of Hillsboro station, and the preachers on High-

land circuit be a Visiting Committee to the Seminary.

3. Resolved, That the proposition submitted by the Board of Trustees, of the contemplated female college in Hillsboro, Ohio, is hereby accepted: Provided, no pecuniary responsibility be assumed by this conference.

4. Resolved, That we recommend the election of James H. Thompson, John Basken, Jonas R. Emrie, Alexander Buntain, William I. Fee, William H. Trimble, Jacob Saylor, and David Fenwick, as Trustees of the female college at Hillsboro.

5. Resolved, That the Bishop be requested to appoint Rev. A.

M. Lorrain, an efficient Agent for said institution.

PROPOSITION OF THE TRUSTEES OF HILLSBORO FEMALE, COLLEGE.

The Oakland Female Seminary, at Hillsboro, Ohio, has been is operation about fifteen years. As it is the enterprise of an individual, it is probable that at his death the institution would be be broken up. To prevent such a result, Bishops Simpson and James last fall at conference, at Hillsboro, advised that the Church should take hold of it, erect commodious buildings, and render the institution permanent. A new church had just been erected, which cost about eight thousand dollars, and it was feared that a subscription sufficiently large for the erection of a female college could not be immediately procured. The quarterly meeting conference, however, took hold of the matter in April last, and appointed a Board of Trustees. They have procured a subscription of about two thousand dollars in Hillsboro, and about a thousand dollars elsewhere. It is believed that the subscription in Hillsboro can be raised to eight thousand dollars, or more.

It has been the intention, from the beginning, to place the institution under the patronage and control of the Cincinnati conference, and to request them to appoint an agent to procure funds. The Trustees propose to the conference, that they—the conference—shall elect eight trustees, and their successors, and that the stockholders shall elect seven, giving the conference the balance of power. The plan the Trustees propose for the collection of funds, is, to allow every subscriber of one share of stock, or more, ten per cent. interest on such subscriptions when paid, which interest shall be payable in tuition forever. Twenty-five dollars will be one share of stock, and the price of tuition is not to be more than twenty-five dollars a year. At this rate a subscription of two hundred and fifty dollars would keep one pupil in the institution forever, free of tuition. But it is presumed that, if they succeed in getting the institution well endowed, the price of tuition will be much reduced and the same subscription would pay for more scholarships. The Trustees propose to raise fifty thousand dollars, and so expend twenty or twenty-five thousand in buildings, apparatus, etc., and to place the balance at interest for endowment. They desire to establish a first-rate female college.

They desire, for an agent, one of the best and most efficient men in the conference, and they pledge for him a liberal support. The work is important, not only to procure money for this institution, but to lead the membership of the Church to the exercise of benevolence on principle. Many have given liberally to Delaware and other institutions; but there is much wealth in the Church yet unappropriated, and an institution of this kind is needed in southern Ohio.



We still believe in the vast importance of Bethel operations, and that the purity of our shores demands that the great torrent of depravity that is pouring through our commercial channels should be arrested. We believe, moreover, that the Western Seamen's Friend Society has accomplished much good in many portions of the field over which it has taken supervision. In the last year several of the stations have had precious seasons of refreshing, and in all some good has been accomplished. As the agents of the Society have annually solicited our views in regard to the enterprise, and as we have, from time to time, given them, according to the light which we have had, we would humbly suggest to the Society that we believe that the managers might greatly amplify the success of the institution, by appointing subordinate boards, or committees of a local character, to control the affairs of those Bethels which are situated in our large commercial towns. The circumstance of their having been directed, as they have been, by a foreign and distant management, has a tendency to impoverish the interest of the Churches in the enterprise.

We have, for some time, felt the necessity of having some common form of worship and some liberal bond of communion under which we might form ecclesiastical or religious associations, so that our scattered sheaves might be gathered and bound together in the spirit of union and bonds of love. We are happy in hearing, from the Financial Secretary, that such a plan of Church communion has been adopted, and is operating successfully. That plan allows every minister employed to use the ordinary and prudential means of grace and form of worship to which he has been accustomed. As a conference, we feel as ever bound to sustain the Bethel work, and pray for its success and perpetuity.

manufacturing of these drinks; therefore,
1. Resolved, That we will continue prudently, but firmly, to execute our rules against the traffic in and the use of intoxicating

drinks as a beverage.

2. Resolved, That the practice, on the part of our members, of selling grain for the purpose of distillation, and the furnishing of materials for carrying on the business, is reprehensible, inasmuch as it is inseparably connected with the iniquity of the traffic; and

they are hereby affectionately urged to desist from the practice.

3. Resolved, That, in view of the beneficial results arising from the enactment of prohibitory laws in other states, that we will lend our aid and influence, in all commendable ways, to secure one

adapted to our state.

4. Resolved, That, in order to advance the great temperance movement, every minister be requested to preach or lecture on the subject of temperance as often as circumstances may justify.

Christians who are jealous for the honor of God must see to it that they are free from all participation in this guilt. If God has absolutely forbidden attention to any worldly avocation on that day; if he has forbidden all labor, either of man or beast, no excuse can justify the breach of the express command of God. No one can be blameless who neglects to hallow this day which God has sanctified, and the observance of which he has so repeatedly and minutely enjoined. The day which we feel to be one of the choicest boons of heaven to manno language can exaggerate the guilt of those who, by their exam-nle and influence, lead others to disregard this day. Your Comple and influence, lead others to disregard this day. mittee, therefore, recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

- 1. Resolved, That such is the vital importance of the Sabhath, and such its influence upon all the great interests of men, that its due observance ought to receive the earnest attention, the fervent prayers, and the hearty, active, and persevering co-operation of all the friends of God and man throughout the world.
- 2. Resolved, That all the members of this conference be most affectionately and earnestly requested to preach frequently in their congregations on the sanctification of the Sabbath, and to urge its importance in families while attending to their pastoral work.

The anniversary of the Society was field on Monday evening, October 2d, in Wesley Chapel. The attendance was large, and the exercises deeply interesting.

The opening religious exercises were conducted by Rev. Dr. Clark, after which the reports of the Secretary and Treasurer were

read and adopted.

Thrilling addresses were then made by Rev. Jesse T. Peck

and Dr. Durbin, of New York.

The basket collection was then taken up, after which the meeting was dismissed with the benediction.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

We meet this evening to celebrate the third anniversary of the Cincinnati Conference Missionary Society. Devout thanksgiving is due to our heavenly Father for his gracious favor toward this Society during the year. But one of our number from the ministry has fallen by death—the meek, sensible, pious Meredith. He fell at his post, ceasing at once his life and his work.

The blessing of God has so attended and crowned the labors of the past year, as to enable this Society, through its Treasurer, to present, this night, an aggregate of collections largely in advance of former years. The increase over last year is about 20 per cent.

The introduction of the Disciplinary Plan, adopted at the last General conference, into many of the charges, has, doubtless, contributed much toward this desirable result. An increase, secured by such means, promises to be permanent, because it is the result of a well-arranged system, having at its center the principle, that the missionary cause is of God and belongs to the whole memberahip of the Church.

Although the funds of this Society show an increase over other years, it has not yet reached the limits of its obligation. So wide and various are the doors opening into destitute and heathen lands, and so loud and imperative the calls of suffering, enslaved, perishing man, that no former standard of liberality will meet the present and prospective responsibilities of the Church of Christ.

"The world is my parish," was the favorite sentiment of the immortal Wesley—a sentiment worthy of the heart and the theology of the founder of our Church. To reach this consummation, and thus fulfill the commission of Wesley's Master, is the object of this and kindred associations. A Gospel, equal to the wants of the whole world, must be preached in all the world. The whitened harvest field of immortal souls is not yet reaped. Prayer should ceaselessly go up to the great Lord of the harvest, both for means and men, as well as for the ultimate results of success.

The accumulation of wealth, in Christian families and nations, suggests at once the privilege and peril of the Church of Christ. The silver and the gold are the Lord's. They have been largely transferred to Christian countries, and thereby made subject to Christian control. If these accumulating treasures shall be devoted to Christ, and not to self; if they shall be employed in schemes of pure Christian philanthropy, and not to purposes of luxury, pride, and self-gratification, then, indeed, will it not have been in vain that God has bestowed upon the professing world an overflowing substance with which to honor him.

Let us hope that in this great work the missionary Church, and especially the Cincinnati conference, will be found fully meeting the utmost measure of their obligations to God and the world.



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

Summary of Conference Proceedings.

QUARTERLY REVIEW.

Resolved, That it is the sense of this conference that the Quarterly Review, of which Dr. M'Clintock is editor, supplies a desideratum in our literature which is indispensable, and that we most heartily approve of the general conduct of that work, and deprecate any change in regard to the character of its recent articles.

WESTERN CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE AND LADIES' REPOSI-TORY.

Resolved, By the Cincinnati conference, that we cordially approve of the manner in which the Western Christian Advocate and Ladies' Repository have been conducted during the past year, and that we will make renewed efforts to extend their circulation.

SKETCHES OF WESTERN METHODISM.

Resolved, That, in the writing and publication of Sketches of Western Methodism, Rev. J. B. Finley has done an important work for the Church, and we most cordially commend the book to the Christian public.

CONFERENCE BIOGRAPHY.

Resolved, That we most cordially approve of the praiseworthy undertaking of brother Gaddis to publish a work with the above title, containing many interesting facts respecting deceased itinerant ministers and deceased wives of itinerant ministers, and heartily recommend its speedy publication, and that we will aid him as far as possible in procuring all necessary information to do justice to the memories of those worthy men and women of God who rest from their labors, and whose works do follow them.

ALLOWANCE TO PREACHERS.

Resolved, That we recommend to the General conference at its next session so to alter our Discipline that the quarterage claim of an unmarried man be two hundred dollars, and the quarterage claim of a married man three hundred dollars.

Resolved, That we respectfully instruct our delegates to use their influence to effect this change.

Reports of Committees.

REPORT OF THE FINANCIAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee are satisfied that it is the privilege and duty of every member of the Methodist Episcopal Church to contribute liberally for the support of the ministry and other institutions of the Church; and to accomplish this great end, it is important that we have some more efficient financial plan, which will bring the official and private members of the Church into a more intimate and harmonious co-operation, and it is very important that this co-operation commence with each conference We, therefore, recommend for adoption the following plan, when the same is not otherwise provided for—as in the sale of pews, etc.

1. Let the presiding elder of each district call a meeting of the district stewards, as provided for in Discipline-page 181as early as practicable—not more than three weeks subsequent

to the adjournment of conference.

2. That a financial meeting of the stewards, leaders, and estimating committee of each charge in the district, be held on the first Saturday after the district stewards' meeting. The place shall be fixed by the last quarterly conference for the year.

preacher in charge to be chairman of the meeting.

3. The financial meeting shall district the charge among the stewards for their special supervision, and ascertain the amount necessary to meet the current expenses of the year. The financial meeting shall then divide or apportion the whole amount among the several classes within the charge, according to num-

bers, circumstances, and privileges.

4. That it shall be the duty of each steward, as soon as the estimate shall be made, to report to each class in his district the amount apportioned to it, and see that the same be provided for by a voluntary subscription, or apportioned among the members by a committee of their own appointment, of three or five of its number, the whole to be paid in weekly, monthly, or quarterly installments, as the societies may determine.

5. That in every Sabbath appointment, and others, where it may be deemed expedient, the society may appoint one or more individuals to circulate a subscription among persons who are not members of our Church, yet attend our ministry.

6. That at each quarterly conference strict inquiry shall be made into the state of the finances of the charge, as follows: 1. Let the secretary call the name of each leader, and at the same time the steward representing the district to which the

leader belongs, shall report the amount apportioned to his class, and the deficiencies, if any, and state to the conference how the finances of the class stand for the quarter. 2. The presiding elder shall inquire at the same time, if the stewards and leaders have fully carried this plan into operation in the class. 3. Whether there be any in the class who are able, but refuse to contribute to the support of the Gospel among them, and the reasons of such refusal. 4. Whether the local preachers and exhorters co-operate with the stewards and leaders in carrying out this plan.

7. That at each quarterly meeting the recording steward shall report to the Church, at the close of reading the quarterly reports, the state of the finances of the charge for the quarter, stating the amount apportioned to each class, the amount received, and the deficiency, if any, and each steward shall see that the same report be made in each class in his district immediately after the quarterly meeting; and if there are deficiencies, the most efficient means be used to make up the amount at once.

8. That to avoid all mistakes in receiving and crediting collections in the class, it shall be the duty of the leader, once a quarter at least, to call over the name of each member, stating the amount paid, that if there be any error, it may be corrected in the class-book.

9. That the preachers be earnestly requested to see that the stewards and leaders carry this system fully into operation, in each class, within the bounds of their respective charges.

REPORT ON COLORED POPULATION.

The Committee to whom was referred the subject of the elevation of the colored people, beg leave to report, that they have given the subject all the attention in their circumstances they could, and offer for the consideration of the conference the following resolutions:

. Resolved, That we recommend the appointment of Rev. John F. Wright as general agent for this conference, to take the incipient

steps for a college for the colored people in this state.

2. Resolved, That our delegates be, and are hereby instructed, to bring this subject before the next General conference for their sanction and assistance.

3. Resolved, That we make an effort to establish Sabbath and

day schools among the colored people.

4. Resolved, That it be the duty of our general agent to co-operate with the African Methodist Episcopal Churches, in promoting Sabbath schools, and other educational interests of the colored people.

- 5. Resolved, That it be made the duty of the general agent to prepare and circulate a petition, to be presented at the opening of the next session of Ohio Legislature, praying for a grant toward the founding and endowment of a college for the colored population.
- 6. Resolved, That we can see no good reason why the prayer of the petitioners of the New-Street Colored Church, of Cincinnati, should not be granted; and if the present or any future work among the colored people, within the bounds of our conference, can be better supplied by colored than by white ministers, and suitable men be recommended to the conference, we can see no good reason why they should not be admitted.

RESOLUTIONS ON SLAVERY.

WHEREAS, the General Rule on the subject of slavery expressly forbids the enslaving of human beings; and, whereas, the voluntary holding of human beings in slavery, without reference to their emancipation, is equal in moral turpitude to their purchase, for the purpose of enslaving them; and, whereas, we deem it proper to express, clearly and definitely, our sentiments on this subject; therefore,

1. Resolved, That we recommend the ensuing General conference so to alter the chapter on slavery that it shall read as follows:

Question. What shall be done for the extirpation of the evils of slavery?

Answer 1. We declare that we are as much as ever convinced of the great evil of slavery; as it is contrary to the law of nature, the law of God, and just human laws; and, inasmuch as our General Rule expressly forbids its initiation and practice, by buying or selling, and, by necessary implication, forbids, also, its perpetration;

Therefore, no person who shall buy, sell, receive, give away, or retain as a slave, any human being, for other than merciful purposes to the enslaved—to wit, their emancipation—shall be eligible to membership in the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Answer 2. Such of our members as may, at any time, have slaves under their care, shall be required to teach them, as far as it is in their power, to read the word of God; to encourage them to attend upon the public worship of God; and to instruct them in regard to the sacredness and inviolability of marriage, and the duties of the parental relation.

2. Resolved, That the General conference make such other changes, in the chapter on slavery, as will make it conform with the preceding declaration of principles.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

WESLEYAN FEMALE COLLEGE, CINCINNATI, OHIO.

We regret that the Visiting Committee to this institution have not furnished us the necessary information to enable us to report respecting it as fully as we desire. We are gratified, however, to be able to report that the College is highly prosperous, that ita halls are thronged with students, and that it continues to maintain its elevated literary reputation. We present the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That the pastors of Wesley Chapel, Ninth-Street, Union Chapel, and Morris Chapel be recommended as a Committee of Visitation and Examination to the College for the ensuing year.

2. Resolved, That the Bishop be requested to reappoint Rev.

P. B. Wilber as President of this institution, and Rev. William

G. W. Lewis as Professor of Mathematics and Natural Sciences.

THE FEMALE COLLEGE AND SPRINGFIELD HIGH SCHOOL.

This institution during the year has been highly prosperous. Two hundred and sixteen pupils have been enrolled in the catalogue, and about one hundred and fifteen have been in average attendance. The reputation of this oldest of the literary institutions under our patronage continues undiminished. If there is any one thing which particularly distinguishes this school, it is thoroughness of instruction. The past year may be regarded as an epoch in the history of this institution. It has been the first year in the new college building. The edifice occupies the most eligible, situation in the city of Springfield, and is large, commodious, and a perfect gem of architectural beauty. This institution deserves, and it is hoped will continue to receive the liberal patronage of the conference and the public. The following resolutions are respectfully submitted:

1. Resolved, That the conference approve of the election of the following persons as Trustees; namely: S. S. Henkle, A. Meharry,

James Johnson, and J. B. Rawlins.

2. Resolved, That the presiding elder of Urbana district and the stationed preachers in Springfield be appointed a Visiting and Examining Committee to the institution.

OAKLAND FEMALE SEMINARY.

This Seminary continues to maintain its high position as an institution of learning. Few, if any, of the schools under the patronage of this conference have a more accomplished principal or a more efficient corps of teachers. It is probable that the Oakland Female Seminary, in name, will cease to exist with the present year. A new board of trustees having been organized, they are now engaged in the erection of a commodious and elegant college edifice, to take the name of the Hillsboro Female College, which will be under the control and supervision of the Cincinnati conference. We recommend

That Joseph H. Mullinix, James H. Thompson, David Fenwick, Edward Easton, Alexander Buntain, J. Milton Boyd, J. R. Emrie, and Henry Turner be appointed as Trustees of the Hills-

boro Female College.

- 2. That the presiding elder of Hillsboro district and the preachers in charge of Hillsboro station and Highland circuit be appointed as an Examining and Visiting Committee to this institution.
- 3. That the Bishop be requested to appoint David Whitmer as its Agent for the ensuing conference year, and to reappoint Joseph M'D. Mathews as its Principal.

XENIA FEMALE ACADEMY.

This school is gradually increasing in the number of its pupils and rising in the estimation of the community. During the past winter it was visited with a gracious revival of religion, which resulted in the conversion of a large number of the scholars. The present year has opened under favorable auspices. This institution has a corps of efficient teachers, and it is confidently hoped that by the fostering care of the conference and the blessing of God it will accomplish much for the cause of Christian

ucation. We present the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That we recommend to the conference to authorize the Board of Trustees of Xenia Female Academy to increase their number to fifteen.

2. Resolved, That W. I. Ellsworth be appointed a committee to procure a certificate of the conference stock in said Academy, and report to next conference.

3. Resolved, That the presiding elder of Xenia district and stationed preacher at Xenia be a Committee of Examination and

Visitation to the Xenia Female Academy.

4. Resolved, That we recommend to the conference to request the Bishop to transfer M. French to the Cincinnati conference, and appoint him as Principal of Xenia Female Academy.



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

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT.

THE Committee to whom the subject of Sunday Schools was

referred offer the following report:

We need not report our former declarations of the importance of this enterprise. The action of the Church declares emphatically our sense of the greatness of the work. Its growing importance demands that we should give it greater prominence in our annual deliberations, as well as in our individual labor in our charges. We can not be too deeply impressed with our duty nor too devoted in its performance.

From the data before your Committee, we are led with pleasure to the conclusion, that the efficiency of the enterprise is steadily increasing. But, while we are gratified with this encouraging view, candor compels the admission that our efforts and success are by no means commensurate with our duties and opportunities; however, it behooves us to ascertain the causes of our partial fail-

ure, and seek, and, if possible, to apply the remedy.

We conclude that the fault, in great part, is with ourselves. Many of us fail to do our whole duty here. In proof we state the well-known fact, that some of our preachers carry forward this enterprise with interest; schools multiply and flourish through their efforts; while others, as uniformly, perhaps, allow the Sabbath school interest to flag, and permit them to drag out a sickly existence, or die outright. And most of us, in retrospecting our labors in this department, see that we have fallen much below the point of usefulness we might have reached.

It is not enough that we occasionally visit the schools and preach an annual sermon on the subject; we need to do much of the labor, and thinking, and planning, and directing, as it is seldom the case that we can find private members prepared to act as we ought to be. Let each of us better acquaint himself with the details of Sabbath school labor, and enter zealously into the work, and we doubt not a marked improvement would soon

appear.

Again, we hear a very general complaint that competent and punctual teachers can not be found. Now it is obvious, that, while this is the case, this interest must languish; nor can it be expected that faithful, zealous teachers can be procured, while there is much manifest apathy on the part of parents, and official, and other members. While there is no Sunday school life in the Church it is folly to look for that interest among teachers, which alone will secure the necessary labor here. The school breathes the atmosphere of the Church, and if this is stagnant, that must languish. The Church must be awakened before the evil can be cured. And we suggest that, by proper effort in the pulpit, in official meetings, and in private, a faithful pastor can do much, very much, to arouse the Church.

The plan of holding circuit and district Sunday school con-

ventions, adopted so successfully in many places, we heartily approve of, and recommend whenever and wherever practicable.

We beg the indulgence of the conference in again calling attention to the collections for the Sunday School Union. We annually declare our approval of the Union, and our purpose to aid it by collections in our several charges, and yet do almost nothing for it. If the Union deserves material aid, let us walk by the same rule, and all make collections for it. If it is not a proper object of the Church's beneficence, let us say so, and not present the inconsistency of approving and promising, and always failing to perform.

to perform.
Your Committee offer the following resolutions as embodying,

in part, our sentiments on the subject referred to us:

1. Resolved, That, while we regard with unfeigned gratitude the increasing efficiency of the Sabbath school enterprise, we acknowledge that this interesting field of usefulness is as yet but partially and imperfectly cultivated by our Church.

2. Resolved, That the Sabbath school cause demands greater prominence in our pulpit ministrations, in our official meetings,

and in our private labors.

3. Resolved, That we recommend the holding of Sabbath school

celebrations and conventions, wherever practicable.

4. Resolved, That the presiding elders be requested to call the attention of quarterly conferences more distinctly to this subject, and otherwise aid in awakening a deeper interest in the cause.

5. Resolved, That we appoint, at this session, a Sunday School Committee, who shall act at the next session of the conference; and that the presiding bishop be requested to appoint said committee, so that one may be taken from each district.

REPORT OF TRACT COMMITTEE.

Your Committee, after mature consideration, are of the opinion that the Tract movement, so auspiciously commenced in our branch of the Church, is worthy of our unanimous approval and support, as an efficient auxiliary to the ministry in the evangelization of the masses.

Believing that the details of our plans should be left subject to such modifications and improvements as the light of experience and the force of providential circumstances may suggest, we recommend the following brief plans to be put into operation in the absence of any thing better:

1. Resolved, That each preacher in charge will secure, in his field of labor, the appointment of one Tract Steward, or more, as the wants of his field may require.

2. Resolved, That the Tract Steward, in conjunction with the preacher in charge, shall employ as many collectors and tract distributers as may be necessary to raise moneys and circulate tract publications.

3. Resolved, That wherever it is judged practicable, money shall be raised by public collection, or otherwise, for the Parent

Society to help on the general cause.

4. Resolved, That the presiding elders be requested to inquire in each of the quarterly meeting conferences what has been done for the promotion of the Tract cause.

REPORT ON FURNISHING PAR-SONAGES.

THE Committee to whom was referred the subject of parsonages,

beg leave to report:

That they have given the subject all the attention they could in the short time allotted to them. The subject is one of considerable importance to the itinerant ministers of our Church, who are periodically changing their places of residence. They find in some instances the parsonages wholly furnished, in others, only partially, while, perhaps, in a majority of instances, they are not fur-This state of things involves the preachers in some nished at all. instances in serious pecuniary losses. For instance, he has furnished the house where he now lives, uses his furniture one or two years, as the case may be, when the authorities of the Church remove him to some distant point of the work, perhaps, when he has, of course, either to remove his furniture, or sell it at a heavy If the parsonage to which he is removing is fully furnished, he does not need his furniture, or if it be partly furnished, he is compelled to part with what he does not need at a heavy sacrifice, or store it away till the close of his service on that field of labor. We know of one instance, and, doubtless, they are numerous, in which the preacher suffered in one or two such removes the considerable sum of \$100; such losses as this few of us are able to sustain.

If our parsonages were all furnished with the heavier articles, as bedsteads, stoves, bookcases, carpets, chairs, clocks, looking-glasses, tables, etc., our preachers would have very little trouble of removing, and in the end would be a great saving to the different circuits and stations, as the moving expenses of the preachers would thereby be greatly curtailed.

Your Committee further find, that in the English Department there about one hundred charges, with but fifty parsonages; and we think we may safely say that not one of these houses is wholly furnished, and but few, perhaps not one in ten, are even partially furnished. Some of our parsonages, too, are in a most wretched state of repair. In the German portion of the work there are about forty charges: of these, twenty-eight have parsonages. These consist mostly of the basement stories of the churches, or connected with the churches.

Your Committee deem it unnecessary to enter into detail on this subject, as the facts in the case are fully known by this conference. We would, therefore, close, by respectfully offering the following resolution:

Resolved, By the Cincinnati conference, in conference assembled, that it shall be the duty of each presiding elder, at his first quarterly meeting after the adjournment of conference, to present this subject to the quarterly conferences on his district, and urge them to see that the parsonages are furnished; and that the presiding elder, in connection with the preachers on the circuits and in the

retations, keep this subject before the people till the object is accomplished.

All which is respectfully submitted.

Hillsboro Female College.

THE Committee on Education submit the following as their

report in part:

We are pleased to learn that this institution still holds its high position as an attractive and thorough school. The former Principal still retains his place as an accomplished and efficient teacher, while his Board of Instruction is unsurpassed in any of our schools. The building, though unfinished, is rapidly approaching completion, and will be ready for occupancy in the early spring, at least in part, when there will, doubtless, be a greatly-increased patronage, a result only hindered now by the want of accommodations in the present building.

Your Committee recommend the adoption of the following

resolutions:

1. That Joseph H. Mullinix, Alex. Buntain, Jas. H. Thompson, David Fenwick, Edward Easton, J. M. Boyd, J. R. Emrie, and Henry Turner, be reappointed as Trustees.

· 2. That the Bishop be requested to reappoint brother David Whitmer its agent for the ensuing conference year; and to resp-

point brother Joseph M'D. Mathews as its Principal.

3. That the presiding elder of Hillsboro district, and the preachers in charge of Hillsboro station and Highland circuit, be appointed as an Examining and Visiting Committee to this institution for the ensuing conference year.

Your Committee had under consideration the following resolutions, passed by the Ohio annual conference, at the request of the Trustees of the Ohio Wesleyan University, and sent to this conference for its concurrence; namely: 1. Resolved, That we, the members of the Ohio conference, transfer to the Board of Trustees of the Ohio Wesleyan University of the Methodist Episcopal Church their interest in the principal of the M'Kendree Fund, originally collected for the benefit of Augusta College, Kentucky; the interest to be used as per agreement, heretofore entered into between the conference and the Trustees of said University.

2. Resolved, That the Commissioners, brothers Swormstedt and J. F. Wright, be authorized to make the transfer as above ordered,

the Cincinnati conference concurring.

Your Committee recommend that this Cincinnati conference do

not concur in the resolution passed by the Ohio conference.

Resolved, That we request the Bishop to reappoint brother L. D. M'Cabe Professor of Mathematics, and brother E. C. Merrick Tutor of the Preparatory Department in the Ohio Wesleyan University.

Resolved, That the Bishop be requested to appoint brother Meharry the superintendent of collections for the Endowment Fund

of the Ohio Wesleyan University.

Xenia Female College.

BROTHER MOODY presented to your Committee the report of the Visiting Committee, accompanied by certain resolutions, all of which we submit as the report of your Committee in reference to said institution:

"The undersigned, the Committee from the Cincinnati conference, appointed to examine the classes, and report on the condition of the Xenia Female College, under the patronage of this conference, would respectfully state, that they have attended to the duties devolved upon them; and they have found that the course of instruction is ample in its range. The Faculty have been diligent in the discharge of their duties; and the young ladies evinced commendable proficiency in the studies enjoined upon them.

"At the close of the summer session the Rev. Mansfield French resigned the Presidency of the College, and the Trustees were very fortunate in securing the services of Rev. Oliver M. Spencer, A. M., in the Presidency of the institution, and the Trustees, through us, hereby respectfully request the presiding Bishop to

appoint brother Spencer to the Presidency aforesaid.

"We find great pleasure in stating that the Faculty connected with brother Spencer is composed of teachers of tried ability and celebrity; and from their signal success as instructors in other institutions of learning of the highest grade, we do most confidently and cordially commend this flourishing institution to the patronage of the Church and the public.

"Through us the Trustees report that the institution is laboring under an indebtedness of some \$3,000, which existed at the close of

the preceding conference year, and we respectfully request the appointment of an efficient agent from this body to solicit funds to liquidate this debt.

"Your Committee would further state that the College has opened with unprecedented patronage, and gives promise of a

prosperous and brilliant future.

1. Resolved, That we recommend the Bishop to appoint Rev. O.

M. Spencer to the Presidency of Xenia Female College.
2. Resolved, That we most heartily commend the Xenia Female

College to the patronage of the Church and the public.

3. Resolved, That the presiding elder of Xenia district, by request of the Trustees, be authorized to employ an Agent for the Xenia Female College.

4. Resolved, That brother Moody be appointed to secure the certificate of stock due this conference, in the Xenia Female Col-

lege, and place it in the hands of the Secretary of this conference.
5. Resolved, That Gen. Merrick, Alfred Trader, the presiding elder of Xenia district, and the preachers in charge of Xenia station, be authorized to vote the stock owned by this conference.

6. Resolved, That the presiding elder of Xenia district, and the preachers in charge of Xenia and Dayton stations, be appointed as the Visiting and Examining Committee to the Xenia Female College for the ensuing conference year.

Wesleyan Female College.

THE Committee on Education desire to report further, in part: In reference to the Wesleyan Female College, your Committee present, first, the report of the Visiting Committee:

"The Wesleyan Female College continues to maintain a high rank among the literary institutions of this country. Its success, the past year, has fully met the expectations of its friends and patrons, and its deservedly high reputation has remained un-diminished and unimpaired. Four hundred and one pupils have been enrolled during the year, and twenty-eight of that number, having completed the course of study, received the honors of the institution.

"The Commencement exercises were of more than usual interest,

and were witnessed by a very large and appreciative audience.

"The present term, which is the commencement of the fifteenth year of the College, opens with encouraging prospects, and it is anticipated that the present will be as the past, and even 'more abundant,' in prosperity.

"The financial condition of the College calls for wise counsels and energetic action. There is an indebtedness on the institution of thirty thousand dollars for real estate, besides a floating debt of some five thousand more. Twenty thousand of the above will begin to fall due in October, 1857. Two thousand dollars a year will then be required till the twenty thousand are paid. Ten thousand dollars will be due in October, 1858, all of which will be required at once.

"To meet the above claims, and to provide for the erection of idditional buildings, which are very much needed, the Trustees propose to sell some twenty-five hundred scholarships, on the fol-

owing terms; namely:

"Scholarships, entitling the holder to two years' tuition, for \$20; three years, for \$25; four years, for \$30; six years, for \$35; eight years, for \$40; twelve years, for \$50; and thirty years, for **8**100.

"The Trustees desire two members of this conference to act as agents the ensuing year, to sell these scholarships, and otherwise to promote the interests of the College.

"M. Dustin, Visiting Committee "WM. I. FRE, of Cincinnati Conference."

Your Committee recommend, for adoption, the following resolution:

Resolved, That we recommend that the request of the Trustees of the Wesleyan Female College, to appoint two agents for the purposes set forth in their petition, be granted, upon the following condition; namely: That for every five hundred dollars the agents may collect and pay over to the Trustees, the Trustees shall issue a certificate of stock, in behalf of the Cincinnati conference, entitling the conference to all the rights of stockholders, tuition excepted.

Resolved, That the presiding Bishop of this conference be requested to reappoint the Rev. P. B. Wilber as Principal of the

Wesleyan Female College for the ensuing year.

Resolved, That the preachers in charge of Wesley, Asbury, and Christie Chapels, be appointed the Visiting and Examining Committee to the Wesleyan Female College for the ensuing conference year.

In view of the fact that the Cincinnati conference is not a corporate body, and, therefore, can not hold property, your Committee

recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That Rev. John T. Mitchell, Secretary of the Cincinnati annual conference, and his successors in office, be appointed a Trustee, in behalf of this conference, to receive and hold all certificates of stock held as the interest of the conference, in our various institutions of learning.

Your Committee recommend the adoption of the following: Resolved, That the presiding Bishop of this conference be requested to reappoint brother J. M. Leavitt as Professor of Lan-

guages in the Ohio University.

Resolved, That this conference will, from this date, require the Principals and Trustees of all the institutions of learning, under the patronage of this conference, to make, annually, exact reports of the financial condition of their several institutions.

Springfield Female College and High School.

THE Committee on Education would respectfully report further in part:

We recommend the adoption of the following resolutions in

regard to Springfield Female College:

1. Resolved, That we recommend the reappointment of Rev. J. W. Weakley, D. D., as President of the Springfield Female Col-

lege for the ensuing conference year.

2. Resolved, That we recommend the appointment of the presiding elder of Urbana district and the preachers in charge of the Springfield stations, as the Examining and Visiting Committees for the ensuing conference year.

Wilberforce University.

Your Committee respectfully submit, that the great objects of this are set forth with sufficient clearness in the report of the Agent—Rev. J. F. Wright—to which we refer.

RESOLUTIONS ON SLAVERY.

- 1. Resolved, That we are as much as ever convinced that the enslaving of men, of the voluntary holding of them in slavery for mercenary purposes, and without reference to emancipation, is contrary to the law of nature, the law of God, and just human law.
- 2. That we devoutly invoke God's blessing and protection upon the widows and orphans and relatives of the murdered husbands and fathers and friends of those who have fallen in unhappy Kansas.
- 3. That we deeply sympathize with citizens banished from their homes, Christians driven from their sanctuaries, pastors forced from the altars of their God to the endurance of personal indignities and violence, or to the bloody ranks of war.
- 4. That as our excellent Discipline asks the question, we hold that in the great question of the extension or restriction of slavery in our country, consistency, humanity, and Christianity imperatively demand of us to use all appropriate influences in behalf of the holy cause of human liberty.
- 5. That we will, according to our ability, contribute material aid for the relief of brother Dennis and his colleagues, of the Kansas Mission conference, whose losses, privations, and sufferings are only equaled by their firm and noble devotion to the cause of religious and civil freedom, in this hour of their greatest need.
- 6. That we can not be deterred from declaring the whole counsel of God on the subject of intemperance, slavery, licentiousness,

and other moral wrongs, because any or all political systems or social organization, whose complicity with these immoralities may induce them to consider it their interest to silence the voice of the pulpit by the outcry of political preaching. Most firmly believing that the Gospel is as distinctly a system of morals to be observed, as it is also a system of facts and doctrines and privileges to be believed and enjoyed; and fidelity to our country requires us to vindicate and encourage righteousness, which exalteth a nation, and to denounce sin, which is the reproach of any people. Resolved, That the thanks of this conference be given to the Committee and Agents of the Wilberforce University, for their energy and efficiency in securing the Tawawa property, and collecting funds.

Resolved, That the President of this conference be requested to appoint brothers J. F. Wright and M. French Agents of the

Wilberforce University for the ensuing year.

Resolved, That brothers W. I. Fee, W. G. W. Lewis, and G. Moody, be appointed Visitors to Wilberforce University.

Xenia Female College.

1. Resolved, That the presiding Bishop be requested to reappoint Rev. O. M. Spencer to the Presidency of the Xenia Female College for 1857-8.

2. Resolved, That the Cincinnati conference most heartily commend this institution of learning to the patronage of the

Church and the public.
3. Resolved, That the presiding elder of Xenia district, and the pastors of Xenia and Dayton stations, and the preachers on the Union and Jamestown circuits, be appointed as an Examining and Visiting Committee to this institution for the ensuing conference year.

IRISH MISSION FUND.

THE Committee appointed on the subject of the Irish Mission would respectfully report that they have received, and carefully considered the communications submitted to them, in relation to this important enterprise; and believing, as we do, that a steady, patient, and vigorous prosecution of this mission is of vast importance to that country, to our own country, to the Church, and to the world, we trust that the friends of humanity and religion will not relax their exertions in this noble cause, and feeling ourselves indebted-under God-to the Emerald Isle for the first scintillations of Methodism, we feel in duty bound to do what we can for that oppressed but interesting people. And, in view of what has been done, the efforts now making, and the liberal contributions of our people, we are encouraged to hope for ultimate success in the regeneration of unhappy Ireland.

Your Committee, therefore, recommend the following resolu-

tions:

Resolved, That we deem it important to the success of the Irish mission, that an efficient agent be appointed, to assist those now engaged in the work of raising funds, and to succeed them, and close up the work, when they shall have returned to their

own country. And

Resolved, That the Bishop is hereby requested to appoint the

Rev. J. M. Leavitt to said agency.

REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRA-TION OF DISCIPLINE.

THE Committee appointed to inquire into the uniformity of administration, in regard to enforcing the rule in relation to class meetings, present the following as their report:

Your Committee consider that uniformity in administering the Discipline of the Church entire is of vital importance to the peace, harmony, and prosperity of the Church, and should therefore be aimed at by every minister who is intrusted with the administration by the Church. Your Committee, after having consulted the most reliable sources of information in regard to this subject, are of opinion that there is a pretty general uniformity in the administration of Discipline within the bounds of this conference. But they are also forced to the conviction that there is a strong tendency at the present time to relax the enforcement of disciplinary rule, and this is especially true in regard to the rule requiring attendance upon the class meetings of our Church. causes have contributed to this result. Some pastors and leading members have urged that there was no Scripture warrant for such a requirement. Official boards have sometimes refused to sus-Too great laxity in receiving tain the enforcement of the rule. members into full connection with the Church-permitting the classes to become too large-a too often neglect of the pastoral work-a lack of settled principle in the performance of religious duty—and last, though not least, a lack of spirituality—these and other causes that might be mentioned have led to the result which we here deplore. A lax discipline in the Church of God has been a fruitful source of many of her errors, and much of her wrong doing in the history of the past, and may, and will be, the bane of our own Church, if not carefully guarded against. The experience of nearly a century has taught us the great value, if not the absolute necessity, of the institution of class meeting as a means of moral discipline and spiritual culture. It is the nursery where we foster the lambs, and tend the flock; and however sister Churches may succeed without such institution, it seems to be necessary to our spiritual well-being. In the language of an intelligent converted German, "the class meeting is to the Methodist Church what the hoops are to the barrel."

then, the class meeting be an essential part of our prudential economy, it is proper that it should be enforced by a rule requiring its observance.

We therefore offer the following resolutions for adoption:

- 1. Resolved, That it is the province of any Christian Church to institute such terms of membership for Disciplinary purposes, and the spiritual good of her members, as may seem necessary; provided they are in harmony with the teachings and principles of the New Testament.
- 2. Resolved, That the institution of class meeting in our Church is essential to a wholesome moral discipline, and the spiritual prosperity of her members.

3. Resolved, That it is the duty of all our ministers having pastoral charges to enforce faithfully, but prudently, the rule requiring attendance upon class.

4. Resolved, That we most earnestly but affectionately advise, counsel, and exhort the members of our Church not to neglect

their class meetings.

5. Resolved, That the preachers be required to meet the classes as often as practicable, and to facilitate this end it is desirable that the work be so arranged in the different charges as not to require the preachers to preach more than twice on the Sabbath.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

YOUR Committee are compelled to admit, that, of late, there has been an increasing declension of the general temperance reformation. It is no uncommon thing now to see what has seldom been seen for the last twenty years—the sparkling and seducing decanter, unvailed, in our wedding and social parties, and hdies, yet in their teens, sipping, with shameless sang froid, what would craze a genuine teetotaler. In our national anniversaries and public banquets the old barbarous custom of toasting ourselves sick, out of tender regard for the health of others, is greatly reviving; and the more scientifically liquors have been analysed, and the more nakedly their ingredients have been turned up to the noonday sun, the more thirsty the intemperate seem for the ruinous draught. Our post-offices—the purity of which ought to be dear to every American citizen—are thrown too often into groggeries and dens of drunkenness, where females and children can not approach without being exposed to blasphemies and sickening exhibitions of human depravity. Our Church has always co-operated with every institution laboring to establish national and social temperance in our land; but during the whole fight we have not neglected our own concern—the lodge of Methodism—so that, notwithstanding the increase of our membership, we have at this time less to do with intoxicating apirits than we ever had.

With great delight we state that the cause of temperance in the Methodist Episcopal Church has been continuous, onward, onward, from our organization.

> "Bent on purpose grand and glorious, Her banners move in course victorious."

The experience of many years has confirmed us in the doctrine, that the religious reformation of the drunkard is the most reliable—the most permanent. Lorenzo Dow used to say that there were but two specifics in the case: one was to put an eel in a quart of rum, and drink generously; the other was the grace of God. We never had any faith in his eel-bounce; but the grace of God we can label, "Tried."

We know of only one medium now in connection with the Church and still-house: "That corn!" O, that corn! Some of our folks are still engaged in that wicked and disreputable commerce. Our brethren who may not have been thrown where Satan's choice seats are may not be initiated into the modus operandi. As soon as you approach such a place, the black temple of Copper Nosey looms up, like nothing else but the back door of hell. As you advance you will encounter a toper in almost every square, all in different stages of progress. One is quite good-natured, and comfortably "how came ye so?" Another is raging and declaiming as if he were the Emperor of the Moon. A third is peaceably sleeping on the sidewalk, with his cheek slapped up against a curb-stone—

"The flies creeping in, and the flies creeping out, And sporting his eyes and his nostrils about."

But here comes a team, superannuated and gaunt, and behind, mounted on a pyramid of corn, high and dignified, sits an exhorter, or, it may be, a local preacher. Our preacher dares not pass the last-mentioned case. He has a commission from the Church, and reins up, and, descending from his high estate, he roots the drunkard over with his muddy boot, and says, "Halloo,

here! are you not ashamed to be lying here, dead drunk, in open daylight?"

The drunkard drawls out, "Ashamed enough! but you brought me to it!"

"How can you make that out?"

"Why, you carry your corn to the distillery; they make the sparkling whisky; I drink, and become fuddled; but you are 'the great first cause, least understood."

The drunkard rolls back on his curb pillow; the preacher drives on, lamenting the wickedness of these degenerate days, but scowls defiance at every Templar, Son, or Daughter he may meet.

The preacher in charge says, "I'll have a big meeting; that I will." "Do so," say the pious; for, as it was of old, so now there are some, even in Sardis, who have not defiled their garments. The meeting comes on; several are powerfully convicted; the big tears course down their cheeks; but still they come not. A friend says, "Try them another night; try them once more—only once more;" and so from week to week; but they come not. When you get their only reason why, it is, "We can not come and be surrounded, and talked to, and prayed with, by those who are living, as we believe, in mortal sin." The preacher sees that there is a class of people around which Methodism can never reach, till she washes her hands of this iniquity. He sees that he must battle the whole watch with the monster. Perhaps one may be ready to say, as Peter, "And what shall we have, therefore?" Truly, that is a question. Surely, you will have hard times, and may have to eat your own horse; but we hope that, in the spirit of martyrdom, you will say, "Let a hundred horses be devoured; but let the Church of God swing free."

"But," says another, "is there no one to whom we can look for help in this age of reformation?" You will have to gather instruction from behind the reformation. A pious Catholic woman was seen weeping on the street. A passenger inquired what was the matter. "O, sir," said she, "I have lost my crucifix, and now I have nothing to pray to but Jesus Christ!" You must not lean on the outsiders, though temperate they be. They will look complacently on, and be highly diverted, like the frontier mother who stood in her cabin door and beheld, with a smile, her husband engaged in mortal combat with a huge bear. When the hunter had gained the victory, with the skin of his teeth, he upbraided his wife for not coming to his rescue, and especially for smiling at the blood and sweat he had shed. She coolly replied that she had never seen a fight before in which she felt so little interest, as it regarded who might whip. Funds they have, but they must go for ice-cream, and oyster suppers, and picnics, and costly music, so that the inebriates say they have only changed the complexion of intemperance, and are like unto a man who boasts highly of having quit tobacco chewing, but, nevertheless, smokes like a locomotive.

Brethren, the minister of God has a work to do in temperance that none other will or can do. His temperance is not only a human virtue, but a Christian grace; not only the temperance that rejects manifest poison, but "temperance in all things." He admires and indorses the temperance that won Cyrus an empire; but he strikes for that temperance at which God has priced the crown incorruptible. Our preachers, however, have much to encourage them.

1. We know some who once traded with the distillery who have abandoned it as a loathsome thing, and we believe they would suffer martyrdom before they would be driven back to the

practice.

2. Others are in a transit state. When we speak to them on the subject, they will smile and say, "Well, in truth, I do not like the business. I have thought some about quitting; but I can not see my way exactly clear just now, and for the present will have to do as I have done." We here bless God and take courage. It requires only a little more effort to capsize a cake already half turned, and our late President Taylor said, in a similar case, "A little more grape, Captain Bragg!"

8. The best is, no Methodist believes in whisky-growing, Those who contend for the practice never advance one argument that half satisfies themselves. The discerning minister always discovers in them evident marks of painful conviction,

and their whole demeanor silently but foreibly declares,

"We know the right, but still the wrong pursue."

"Then," it may be asked, "why do they do it?" We answer There is a sin that underlies the whole transaction—a sin as fata to the soul as drunkenness—covetousness. All Methodist farmers would prefer a clean trade, all things being equal; but the offer of two cents more on the bushel, or the paltry expense of toll, determines the will, and drives the wagon to the still-house; and it is notorious that the most wealthy among them are penurious to a proverb. They stick to the poll-tax which the stewards adopt in their estimate; and they seem to think that it is the duty of the preacher—be he rich or be he poor—to bear one-half of the expenses of their wealthy circuits. If they can not come out of his pocket, they must come out of his horse, or his hide; for the doctrine is stereotyped on the cerebrum and cerebellum, "The leaner the hound the swifter the chase."

So we find, without elaborate search, that the idolatry of covetousness is the jackal of the still-house. When this calm and settled avarice is lashed into a tempest by the preaching of temperance, it becomes doubly distilled, and threats of starvation fall thick and heavy. True, they sometimes make a benevolent effort, when they go through the process of what is called, in those parts, "buying up the preacher"—a donation call. The preacher may be entirely ignorant of the design; but, whether he is or

not, he will have the extreme mortification, when he comes to the footing of his quarterage, to find that he has been made to buy up himself, besides making presents to his own wife and children of some pretty toys, which smile in contrast with the furniture of the parsonage, but which will by no means make the pot boil. What is the conclusion?

(1.) There is not a shadow of doubt resting on this body in regard to the man who stands day by day at his bar, dealing out poison and death to his neighbors and neighbors' children, destroying the peace of families, and inciting to desperate deeds, and ofttimes bloody murder. He is wicked—his act immoral.

(2.) Neither do you entertain a doubt concerning the merchant who supplies him, and is accessory; for if the first serves Baal a little, he serves him a great deal. He is not only a co-worker with that retailer, but with a hundred others, so that his guilt is out at compound interest. His standing partially behind the screen avails nothing. His bread and butter depend on the diligence with which his customers retail their drams. And in the same proportion he lays up gold and silver, he treasures up wrath against the day of wrath. His trade is immoral.

(3.) We need not say you have no doubts about the distiller. He has none about himself, and commonly he envinces no desire to rob any evangelical Church of livery to serve the devil in. His greatest claim on mercy is—he is no hypocrite. Neverthe-His greatest claim on mercy is—he is no hypocrite. less he is immoral.

(4.) The whisky-growing farms are the only available arsenals of the vast army of intemperance, and the Methodist farmers who cultivate them make it their business to roll the ammunition down to the nearest magazine of woe, and on the 23d or 25th of November offer thanksgiving to almighty God for the abundant harvest of spiritual grape and cannister. Now, neither the distiller nor the vender could carry on their work of desolation without the cultivator. So he has the unenviable distinction of setting this vast machinery of insanity and death in motion. And if he who putteth the bottle to his neighbor's mouth is bending under the curse of the Almighty, what must we say of those mischievous commissaries who keep that bottle supplied with an inexhaustible stream of anguish and ruin? True, they plead their own cause; and who does not? But their two main points of defense are so weak that we can hardly attribute them to the instigation of the devil.

1. They say that whisky is made for medical purposes. we answer that no conscientious and intelligent physician, in view of the late analysis of Ohio whisky, would prescribe it even for the botts. It is wicked to follow a business that does more

harm than good to our world.

2. If every drop of it is made for medical purposes, still the world would breathe easier in the absence of a medicine which alternately saves one and kills a thousand.

sionary treasury. The cry for light bursts from all lands. Mountains sink, valleys rise, crooked places become straight, and rough places plain, in furtherance of the great salvation. The masses of our own republic, if not speedily reached, must perish, and in their ruin drag down the very pillars of our Government. While thrones tremble, and systems fail, and science extends a welcome hand, shall we withhold our contributions? Shall we recall our forces from lands which their feet have consecrated? Shall we stifle the voice of our missionaries on the banks of the Ganges, along the gold streams of Africa, in the islands of the sea, and the lanes, and jails, and alleys of our own land? Especially, shall we abandon them now, when in one portion of the world they are exposed to the knife and fire of the brutal Sepoy? While other Churches pour forth their treasures, and send out their laborers, shall we tear down the standard of a free, full, and present salvation, from shores where it has long floated? We answer, "Nay!" We heartily comply with the suggestions of We cordially recommend that a special meeting be our Board. held in every circuit and station in our conference, within sixty days, for the purpose of making special collections for the missionary cause.

Your Committee further propose, that it be insisted that such extraordinary efforts in no measure interfere with our usual contributions, or our obligations to any other of the great enterprises to which we stand pledged. They suggest, that, on the occasions specified, the facts in regard to our expected deficiency of sixty thousand dollars, be laid before our people, and that the most urgent appeals be made to raise a sum sufficient to extinguish our present debt, and lay the foundations in the future for more ex-

tended operations.

Your Committee would also notice, and reprobate a serious evil complained of in the Circular. They allude to the appropriation of funds for private missionary enterprises. It is obvious that our Board, in order to arrange their plans, must know exactly on what sums they can depend. But if in scores of Churches moneys are withdrawn for one, or two, or three years, and then perhaps returned, or what is worse, never restored to our treasury, it is palpable that all our operations must be vacillating and uncertain.

Your Committee, in view of these facts, submit the following

resolutions:

1. Resolved, That we most cordially respond to the Circular of the Missionary Board, and within sixty days hold extraordinary meetings in all our charges, for the purpose, in addition to every other obligation, of meeting the entire deficiency of our missionary treasury.

2. Resolved, That we sincerely regret the withdrawal of funds from the general treasury, for private missionary enterprises, and that we will discourage this spreading and injurious practice, by

constantly advising our people to place their contributions at the disposal of the Missionary Board.

REPORT ON PARSONAGES.

Your Committee regard it of great importance to the comfort and success of the ministry among us, that each charge be supplied with a good parsonage, well furnished with heavy furniture.

We must have a place to live, and that man must be heavily pressed in mind and heart, and greatly retarded in his work, when his family is cooped up in the damp, uncomfortable basement-rooms, as with many of our German brethren, or in the small, ill-constructed, and inconvenient houses provided in many of our English charges. In our large circuits this is felt still more heavily, where the necessity of the work calls the minister away from his family through a great part of the winter 10280n.

The sentiment that any place will do for the minister that has sacrificed, on the altar of the itinerancy, already so much of domestic comfort and convenience, is unworthy any good man, and should be repudiated by every one in our ranks, by refusing to occupy those houses that are always for rent, because unfit for occupancy. There is no good reason why we should be de-prived of the comforts and conveniences of as good homes as the large body of our membership enjoy.

The statistics show about one-third of our charges supplied with good parsonages, and but few of these meagerly furnished. If we would remedy this state of things we must act uniformly and earnestly. Let this subject be kept before the official bodies of all our charges and the entire membership, till every charge in

our bounds shall be well supplied in this respect.

Your Committee would further recommend, that we use the same care and diligence in keeping our parsonages in repair, and planting out fruit and ornamental trees, especially on our circuits,

as if the property was our own.

Again, your Committee would suggest, that, inasmuch as our circuit work is constantly changing, some plan be adopted by which the funds subscribed by any one part of the charge may be refunded, if thereafter separated from said charge.

Your Committee would further report, that the action of the last session of this body, on this subject, has been attended to on some of the districts, in others partially, and in others omitted.

Your Committee believe this to be the best plan to bring this

matter before our membership, and would therefore recommend the readoption of the resolution of last year on this subject.

REPORT ON FINANCES.

THE Committee on Finance, appointed by this conference to act in conjunction with delegates appointed by and representing the several presiding elders' districts of this conference, beg leave to report, that they have given this subject their mature attention. We have carefully examined the plan adopted by this conference two years since; likewise the plans of some of the neighboring conferences. The result of our examination, and the reports that have reached us of the success of our own plan, referred to, induces us to believe that it only requires some slight modifications to make it all we desire. We, therefore, recommend the following plan for adoption where other provision is not made, as in the sale of pews, etc.:

- 1. There shall be a meeting of all the stewards and leaders, and the estimating committee, in each church and station, to be held at such time and place as the last quarterly meeting conference of the preceding year shall appoint, or, in case no appointment is made by the quarterly meeting conference, shall meet at the call of the preacher in charge, in which meeting the preacher in charge shall preside. It shall be the duty of this meeting to ascertain the entire amount of claims upon the circuit or station, for the support of the ministry, and apportion to each society or class the amount required of them quarterly, according to their members, abilities, and ministerial services they receive, as far as practicable. The committee appointed to estimate the allowance of the preachers shall report to the financial meeting the amount agreed upon, which report shall be approved or amended by the financial meeting; and in case the quarterly meeting conference shall find it necessary to change the amount agreed upon, then the financial meeting shall so change their apportionments as to conform it to the action of the quarterly conference.
- 2. The financial meeting shall divide the societies and classes as equally as possible, and give each steward his portion of the work. The stewards shall be careful that the people are properly instructed, and that the collectors and leaders are faithful and prompt in the performance of their duties. For the performance of these duties the stewards shall be held to a strict account by their quarterly meeting conference.

- 3. That it shall be the duty of each steward to call a meeting of the leaders of his district as soon after the financial meeting as practicable, at which he shall report the amount apportioned to each society in his district, and the leaders shall apportion the same among the several classes according to numbers and ability to pay; also, the leader or class steward may select some member of the class to solicit aid from persons not members of our Church, but who attend upon our ministry, if it is deemed advisable.
- 4. That at each quarterly meeting conference strict inquiry shall be made into the state of the finances of the charge as follows:
- (1.) Let the presiding elder inquire what amount is necessary for ministerial support this quarter?
- (2.) The secretary shall call the name of each leader in order—stating the amount apportioned to his class per quarter—to which the leader shall respond, stating the amount collected; and if, after calling all the classes, any should be found deficient in the amounts apportioned to them respectively, it shall be the duty of the steward and leaders of those classes to report to them the amount of said deficiency, and immediately adopt the most efficient means to collect the same, and pay it over to the recording steward, or preachers of the charge, as the board of stewards may direct at the quarterly conference, at which the deficiency occurred.
- (3.) Let the presiding elder inquire at the same time, if the stewards and leaders have fully carried the plan into operation in the class.
- (4.) Whether there are those in the classes who are able, but refuse, to contribute to the support of the Gospel among them, and the reasons for such refusal.
- (5.) Whether the local preachers and exhorters co-operate with the stewards and leaders in carrying out this plan.
- 5. At each quarterly meeting the recording steward shall report to the Church, after the reading of the pastor's quarterly report, the state of the finances of the charge for the quarter, stating the amount apportioned to each class, the amount received, and the deficiency, if any.
- 6. That, to avoid all mistakes in receiving and in crediting collections in the class, it shall be the duty of the leader, once in each quarter at least, to call over the names of each member, stating the amount paid, that if any error exist it may be corrected in the class-book.
- 7. There shall be appointed by the district stewards one lay member from each district to attend the annual conference, who shall, with an equal number of ministers, form a joint committee to change, revise, or amend these regulations, or to present to the conference any other plan of finance which they may devise. These lay members shall have seats within the bar of the confer-

ence, and shall have liberty to speak upon all questions connected with their duties as a committee. This committee shall meet on Friday, at three o'clock, P. M., of the session of the annual conference.

8. The preachers of the conference are earnestly requested to see that the stewards and leaders carry this system fully into operation, in each class, within the bounds of their respective charges. Respectfully submitted.

Resolved, That we deplore the decision of the majority of the Supreme Court of the United States in the Dred Scott case, which, by denying the citizenship of the colored man, exposes

him to nameless wrongs and outrages, without civil redress.

8. Resolved, That we deprecate the scenes of violence, blood, and murder, which are constantly attending the execution of the unjust Fugitive-Slave law, and recommend our people to labor for its repeal.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT.

Your Committee regard the Sabbath school as one of the most important auxiliaries of the Church, and particularly adapted to the religious instruction of her children. We are happy to report that, from all the information we could gain on the subject of Sunday schools, within the bounds of this conference, there is a decided improvement, both in interest and effort in this good cause.

And we are persuaded that this improvement is the result, in a great measure, of the following interesting facts, which your Committee have carefully observed; namely:

1. The pastors have made it a special point to be present in the Sabbath school, and by their presence and efforts to encourage both teachers and scholars. This is a very important feature in this enterprise. It is our candid opinion that it is equally the duty of the preacher to be in the Sabbath school as in the pulpit. The good Shepherd of the sheep who said, "Feed my sheep," also said, "Feed my lambs." He, therefore, who does not labor faithfully, patiently, and diligently for the religious culture of the children of his charge, can not carry out this twofold mission of the Savior.

Greater efforts have been made to secure regular, faithful, and pious teachers—teachers whose hearts are in the work.

This is an essential element in the Sabbath school cause. The practice of employing unconverted and irreligious teachers has been very pernicious to the interests of Sunday schools. As religion is the chief thing to be taught in the Sunday school, it must be clear to all that irreligious persons are seldom suitable for teachers. We earnestly hope, therefore, that the preachers

of this conference will use their best endeavors to secure religious teachers in all our schools.

3. The older, more experienced, and influential members of the Church have been brought into the Sabbath schools as officers and teachers. This is right, just as it should be. Let us continue to labor in this direction, till we shall have secured to this noble enterprise the very best talent, the most commanding influence, and the ripest experience of the Church. Where the Sabbath school is left to the young and inexperienced, it will lose religious vitality, and dwindle into worldly frivolity.

4. Prayer meetings have been established for the purpose of

praying especially for the prosperity of our Sunday schools.

This is right—we need to pray more—we ought to pray more for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon this enterprise.

5. The great and glorious object of the Sunday school enterprise-namely, the conversion and salvation of the children-is beginning to be more clearly seen, deeply felt, and more carnestly

and directly aimed at. This should be the burden of every heart-for this our tears should fall—for this our prayers ascend—to this work our cares and toils should be given, till cares and toils shall end.

Your Committee find, by reference to the tabular report, that the collections for the Sunday School Union have been in a great measure neglected, and generally small, the German districts bringing up more money, in proportion to their membership, than the English work, which is to be regretted. There-

1. Resolved, That all the preachers in charge pay particular attention to the collections for the Sunday School Union.

2. Resolved, That we reaffirm the 1st, 2d, 4th, and 5th resolu-

tions of the report of last year, which are the following:

" Resolved, That, while we regard with unfeigned gratitude the increasing efficiency of the Sunday school enterprise, we acknowledge that this interesting field of usefulness is, as yet, but partially cultivated.

"Resolved, That the Sunday school cause demands greater prominence in our pulpit ministration, in our official meetings, and in our private labors.

"Resolved, That the presiding elders be requested to call the attention of quarterly conferences more particularly to the Sunday school enterprise, and otherwise aid in awakening a deeper interest in this cause.

"Resolved, That the presiding Bishop be requested to appoint a Sunday School Committee, who shall act at the next session of the conference, and that such Committee shall be so appointed

that one may be taken from each district."

3. Resolved, That this conference appoint one layman from each district to act in connection with the Committee appointed by the Bishop. W. I. FEE, Chairman.



REPORTS OF COMMITTEES, ETC.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

THE Committee on Education would respectfully report in

part:

First, on the Xenia Female Academy and Collegiate Institute. From the reports of the Visiting Committee, and the report of the President of the Board of Trustees, your Committee find the institution in a healthy condition. The examinations are reported as highly satisfactory; reflecting credit on both teachers and pupils. There still remains a debt on this institution of twenty-five hundred dollars, which the Board of Trustees feel confident will be removed so soon as the finances of the country become a little more settled. Affliction in the family of the former President, the Rev. Oliver M. Spencer, resulted in his resignation; but the Trustees regard themselves fortunate in securing the services of Prof. W. Smith to fill the place. The school opened on the first of this instant, with increasing encouragement for its future success.

Your Committee would recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That we cordially recommend the institution to

the Church and public generally.

2. Resolved, That the presiding elder of Xenia district, the preacher in charge of Xenia station, and the preachers of Union and Jamestown circuits, be appointed as a Visiting and Examining Committee for the present year.

Springseld Female College.

This institution, under the superintendence of the Rev. J. W. Weakley and his accomplished lady, has enjoyed a reasonable degree of prosperity during the year. About ninety pupils have been in attendance, and ten young ladies have been graduated.

The examinations are represented as having been highly satisfactory, both at the winter term and at the close of the session, so far as the Committee had opportunity to observe.

The school has opened with a fair prospect of success the

present year.

This institution owes a debt of about two thousand dollars, the interest of which is paid annually by Dr. Weakley. He also pays the insurance on the buildings, keeps up repairs, and educates, free of tuition, twenty pupils on scholarships, if they are sent.

This he does, by contract with the Board of Trustees, for the use of the premises.

Your Committee recommend the adoption of the following reso-

lutions:

1. Resolved, That we commend the Springfield Female College to the confidence and patronage of the Church and community generally.

2. Resolved, That we recommend the appointment of Rev. Jno. W. Weakley, D. D., to the Presidency of the institution the

present year.

Hillsboro Female College.

Your Committee, not having any report from the Visiting and Examining Committees, in reference to this institution, except the verbal statement of the preacher in charge of Hillsboro station, that the school has done well during the last year, are compelled to confine their report chiefly to its financial condition, which is as follows:

Your Committee deem it proper to state that the subscription still due, and good, amounting to five thousand five hundred dollars, is only available upon the following condition; namely: That the entire amount of indebtedness be provided for within a given time. So that the true state of the case is, that the institution has an actual debt of \$17,249.42; but, in the event of a given and highly-probable contingency, will owe a debt of \$23,517.66. Your Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That Jas. H. Thompson, Joseph H. Mullenix, James Reece, Henry Turner, John Dill, Jas. J. Dryden, John L. Hughes, and Jas. T. Ayres, be elected Conference Trustees.

2. Resolved, That the presiding Bishop be respectfully requested to appoint Rev. Nimrod M'Donald as the Agent for the ensuing year.

3. Resolved, That the presiding Bishop be respectfully requested to appoint Rev. J. M'D. Mathews as the President of the institution for the ensuing year.

4. Resolved, That the presiding elder of the Hillsboro district, the preacher in charge of Hillsboro station, and the preachers of Highland circuit, be appointed a Visiting and Examining Committee for the College the present year.

Wesleyan Female Cellege.

Though your Committee had no report from the Trustees of this institution, and nothing but a verbal report from the Visiting and Examining Committee, yet we feel it due the institution to say, we have reason to believe its financial condition is about as it has been for some years past.

We recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That we recommend the appointment of Rev. P. B. Wilber as President of the Wesleyan Female College.

2. Resolved, That we recommend the appointment of the pastors of Ninth-Street and Christie Chapel as the Visiting and Examining Committee.

3. Resolved, That we have undiminished confidence in the institution, and heartily commend it to the patronage and confidence of the Church and public generally.

Wilberferce University.

From the report of the Visiting and Examining Committee, your Committee learn that the Principal of this institution and his assistants have proved themselves well qualified for their difficult and responsible position. The examination showed conclusively that the minds of the present class of students are capable of a very high degree of cultivation. Some of them exhibited a proficiency in the higher branches of mathematics, which would be creditable to any institution in the country. The polite and genteel deportment of the students during examinations attracted particular notice. A large and intelligent audience were in attendance at the public exhibition at the close of the year. The music was excellent. The declamations and compositions made a deep impression upon the audience, and for hours they remained delighted spectators of the exercises. The pupils particularly excelled in declamation; a talent which must become an element of power of no mean importance in their future elevation.

The Board of Trustees unanimously voted to carry out the action of the conference at its last session in regard to the transfer of

the University to the Cincinnati and Ohio conferences.

Your Committee find that the property is in a good condition, and with careful and prudent management believe it may be made to fully answer the expectations of its friends.

Your Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That we recommend the appointment of two

agents this conference year.

2. Resolved, That we recommend the appointment of Rev. J. F. Wright and Rev. M. French as Agents for Wilberforce University; and that the agency of brother French be limited to the collection of funds and the payment of the debts of the institution, and that all other matters be referred to the agency of brother Wright.

3. Resolved, That we recommend the appointment of brothers Moody, Herr, and Harris, as the Visiting and Examining Commit-

tee to the Wilberforce University the ensuing year.

4. Resolved, That we recommend the appointment of brothers Fee and Chalfant to secure the deed of transfer to the Trustees on behalf of the Cincinnati conference.

- 5. Resolved, That a sufficient number of the present members of the Board of Trustees of Wilberforce University be requested to resign, so as to give the Cincinnati and Ohio conferences two-thirds of the members of the Board.
- 6. Resolved, That no effort shall be made to have the real estate connected with Wilberforce University conveyed till the Trustees nominated by the Cincinnati conference be elected.
- 7. Resolved, That, should the request of this conference to the Trustees be complied with, the following persons be and are hereby nominated as Trustees of Wilberforce University on the part of the Cincinnati conference; namely: J. F. Wright, A. Lowrey, G. Moody, W. Herr, Philip B. Swing, M. Dustin, Wm. Wood, Moses B. Gatch, John Gowdy, E. Green, W. L. Hypes, and J. Pfaff.

Ohio Wesleyan University.

Notwithstanding the University has sustained but little damage from the late financial crisis, we regret to learn that the Faculty have found it necessary to relinquish a part of their salaries for the current year. The reason for this reduction was the fact that the interest on the M'Kendree fund has not been paid for some years—the interest now amounting to thirty-two hundred dollars. Its financial condition can not be reported quite so good as last year, yet no serious embarrassment has occurred. The usual financial report, from some reason unknown to the President or your Committee, has not been presented. But your Committee are assured by the President that it shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the conference in time to be published in the Minutes; and express the hope, if any action of conference is necessary to grant such a privilege, it will be taken.

Your Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That the presiding Bishop be requested to reappoint Rev. L. D. M'Cabe, D. D., as Professor in the Ohio Wesleyan University.

2. Resolved, That Rev. Wm. H. Lawder and Rev. Wm. Young be appointed the Visiting and Examining Committee for the

ensuing year.

3. Resolved, That we recommend the appointment of Rev. Bishop Morris, D. D., Rev. M. Marlay, and Thomas Parrott, of Dayton, Ohio, as Trustees of the Ohio Wesleyan University.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

On German Education.

It gives your Committee pleasure to report, that the cause of education has begun to awaken a deep interest among the German ministry and membership of the Methodist Episoopal Church. The German preachers of the North Ohio, and Cincinnati, and South-Eastera Indiana conferences, having agreed to create an endowment fund for the support of a German Professor in the Baldwin University, at Berea, Ohio—of which endowment fund ten thousand dollars are subscribed, and partly secured—a German Professor, who promises great efficiency, has been elected, and the department is now in active operation, having already eleven students. In consideration of these facts, your Committee would recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That we recommend to the Germans within the bounds of our conference, and to the German public generally, the Baldwin University, as an institution well adapted to the edu-

cation of German youth in our land.

2. Resolved, That we are especially gratified with the opportunity which German youth have, in this institution, of receiving not only a thorough knowledge of their own language, but common instruction with the American youth in the regular course of collegiate instruction.

REPORT ON THE ADMINISTRA-TION OF DISCIPLINE.

THE Committee on the Administration of Discipline present the following report:

On Class Meetings.

Whereas, we regard the institution of class meeting in our Church as one in harmony with the teachings of the Bible, and eminently calculated to promote the piety, unity, and efficiency of our membership, and our success as a Church; therefore,

1. Resolved, That, as attendance upon class meeting is made a

condition of membership in our Church, as expressed by the question and answer in chapter 5, section 3, page 83, of the Discipline, we do earnestly recommend faithful attendance upon class meeting to all our members, and call their attention to the above-mentioned question and answer.

2. Resolved, That we disapprove that sentiment which regards class meeting as unsuited, or unnecessary to the present interests and future prosperity of our Church.

8. Resolved, That in the formation of new classes, or by the division of old ones, where practicable, we will endeavor to prevent the evils arising from the existence of large classes.

4. Resolved, That as uniformity in the administration of the rule on class meetings is necessary to its efficiency, we will endeav-

or faithfully to carry out the provisions of the Discipline.

5. Resolved, That the presiding elders be requested to ask in each quarterly meeting conference, How has the rule respecting class meetings been observed: 1st. By the members in attending class meetings; 2d. By the preachers in enforcing the rule?
6. Resolved, That the preachers in charge are requested to read

these resolutions, in all the societies, as soon as practicable.

On Receiving Members into Full Connection.

Whereas, great irregularity is known to exist in the mode of receiving members into full connection in our Church; therefore,

Resolved, That we recommend, for present use, the form found in Bishop Baker's work on Discipline, pages 37 and 38, and that, in receiving members into full connection, the occasion be suitably improved by endeavoring to impress upon the applicants the importance of the act.

On Baptism.

Resolved, That it is highly obligatory upon us as ministers of the Gospel, more fully to instruct our members in the nature, subjects, and design of Christian baptism, and to recommend them to consecrate their children to God in baptism, and to urge all applicants for membership, who have not been baptized, to attend to this ordinance as soon as practicable.

The Lord's Supper.

1. Resolved, That in our circuits and stations generally, a more frequent observance of the sacrament of the Lord's supper is highly desirable.

2. Resolved, That we recommend, as far as practicable, that in our stations this sacrament be observed once a month, and on our

circuits, at each appointment, once a quarter.

Sabbath Schools.

Resolved, That we recommend the presiding elders and preachers to give special attention to the Sabbath school enterprise, and that the preachers in stations, and as far as practicable on our circuits, are requested to catechise the children each Saturday afternoon, or at such time as is most convenient.

Dress.

Whereas, this is a day of increasing benevolent enterprise, when the resources of the Church should be devoted to furthering the great ends of the Gospel, and when all the great enterprises of the Church are calling for help, so that, in the language of the Discipline, "It is no time to encourage superfluity in dress;" therefore,

1. Resolved, That, as ministers, we will recommend simplicity in dress, both by precept and example.

2. Resolved, That we recommend this subject to the prayerful

consideration of our members, and earnestly exhort them to heed the apostolic injunction, "Not to adorn themselves with gold, and pearls, and costly array"—1 Tim. ii, 9—and the Disciplinary caution against expensiveness or gayety of apparel—page 73.

3. Resolved, That the requirement of the Discipline, in chapter 4, question 3, page 73, be observed, by preaching on this sub-

ject in all our congregations, as soon as practicable.

Improper Amusements.

Resolved, That in view of the growing evil arising from improper amusements, those preachers having charge of our circuits and stations, are reminded to carry out kindly, yet firmly, the provisions of the Discipline in reference to the rule which forbids the taking of such diversions as can not be used in the name of the Lord Jesus.

REPORT ON FINANCE.

THE Committee on Finance would report, that they have had the subject under consideration, and after carefully examining our present "Plan," and inquiring into its operations, would not now propose any amendments thereto. They have learned, that wherever it has been fully carried out, it has worked well, and produced the most satisfactory results; they have learned also, that, in many circuits and stations, the Plan has not been carried into effect; they would therefore respectfully suggest that the presiding elders urge upon the official boards, who have not heretofore followed the "Financial Plan," adopted at the last session of the Cincinnati conference, that, during the present conference year, they make a full test of its efficiency, by a prompt and earnest compliance with its provisions.

Your Committee would offer the following preamble and resolu-

tion:

Whereas, the duties of the Financial Committee are such as require a careful comparison of the various financial plans in operation, while the data for such comparison are not often present at the seat of conference; and whereas, the lay representatives are appointed at an early period in the conference year; therefore,

Resolved, That this conference be requested to appoint its representatives in the board of finance at the session preceding the

one at which they will be required to act.

Your Committee have had under consideration the memorial from the quarterly conference of Ripley station, and the accompanying resolutions, together with the resolution of brother Van Cleve, and believing that said memorial sets forth the real state of the interests involved, they offer the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That claimants on the funds of the conference be

1. Resolved, That claimants on the funds of the conference be required to give the conference a statement of their temporal condition, and that those who may be able to live comfortably without the funds of conference, be requested to relinquish their claims.

2. Resolved, That the stewards be required to hold a meeting at an early period in the conference session, where ministers charged with such reports shall be heard, and that they then proceed to make their appropriations according to the necessities of the various claimants, which, after such appropriations shall have had the approval of the conference, shall be so distributed.

REPORT ON PARSONAGES.

Your Committee report with regret only sixty-two parsonages in the bounds of Cincinnati annual conference, leaving fifty-five circuits and stations destitute of any. Of the above sixty-two,

there are thirty-four that are probably worth from seven hundred to five thousand dollars, except one at Wesley Chapel, Cincinnati, that is estimated at welve thousand dollars, and the remaining twenty-four are probably worth from \$600 to \$100, which leaves one-half, or nearly one-half, of the whole number unfit residences for the families that are expected to occupy them. Having these facts before us, the Committee submit the following resolutions for your action:

1. Resolved, That it is the opinion of this conference that the preachers, who shall be appointed to those circuits and stations that have no parsonages, should take immediate and energetic

action to secure, by purchase or erection, suitable parsonages, with heavy furniture if possible.

2. Resolved, That we earnestly request and affectionately advise our people to co-operate with their ministers in this important enterprise, and thereby wipe away their reproach.

3. Resolved, That the above direction, etc., be equally applicable to circuits and stations whose parsonages are not suitable resi-

dences.

4. Resolved, That we advise the presiding elder of each district to introduce this subject in his first quarterly conference, and, if possible, secure the co-operation of its members.

5. Resolved, That this report be published in the Western Christian Advocate, and the Christian Apologist, and in the Minutes.

All which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ITINERANCY AND THE PASTORAL OFFICE.

YOUR Committee have duly considered the subject assigned them, and submit the following as the result of their deliberations:

It is the unanimous opinion of your Committee that the itinerant system is a wise and wonderful arrangement—a system founded in philosophy, Scripture, and common sense. It is founded in philosophy, because it recognizes the principle that men, forming themselves into a social unit, are prepared to accomplish vastly more, either for good or evil, than the same number of persons could possibly do should they act independently. It is founded. in Scripture, because it harmonizes with, and is specially adapted to carry out the great commission of our Lord—"Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature." The mode of our appointment, too, is strikingly analogous to that of Christ in

sending forth the seventy disciples and the twelve apostles. true, the permanent ministry contributes largely to the great design of public preaching; but, for the want of a wide range of opportunities, and on account of a lack of diverse gifts with which to ply the people, the results must be comparatively limited; while the itinerant plan, by connecting the weaker and stronger appointments, and by frequent changes, supplies society at large with a great diversity of gifts, and affords to every individual man a wide compass of chances to do good. It is founded in common sense, because it assumes an obvious truth that, in every congregation, there are different tastes and idiosyncrasies, to which no single mind can suit itself to the best advantage for a series of years. Secondly, it prudently recognizes the love of novelty as a trait of human nature, and seizes upon it to arrest attention and allure to the cross and heaven. Thirdly, it takes for granted, as a natural result, that the minister himself being a man, will be waked up and inspired by new circumstances and change of Fourthly, because it is fitted to do the greatest amount locality. of good to the largest number, in the shortest time, and with the least expense.

But the itinerant plan needs not to be supported by abstract theoretical reasoning in order to show its superior utility. It is now a time-honored institution. For more than a century it has invited the gaze and challenged the criticism of the Christian world. History must now speak its praise, or pronounce its condemnation. What is the testimony of recorded facts, stretching through a hundred years? It is, that the itinerancy has been more successful in promulgating truth than any other system ever adopted. We think the proposition susceptible of proof, that its saving effects, during the last hundred years, exceed the aggregate results of all other Church organizations for the same length of time. If so, it must be conceded that those who would abolish

or impair this system merit rebuke or pity.

We do not take the position that the itinerancy is a divine institution, nor do we say no changes can be made which would have the effect to increase its efficiency; but we do take the ground that all proposed modifications are problematical in their results, while the system as it is, stands before the world a tried instrumentality-tried by varied experience. It is the product of a problem which has occupied a century in its solution, and that product is one of almost miraculous success. admonished, then, not by a specious hypothesis, or strong argument, but by unequaled, prodigious success, not to mar the integrity of the system. The man who comes to us seeking changes, who is not above suspicion as a true Methodist, should not be listened to for a moment; while the veteran Christian who has proved himself faithful to our best interests during the long run of an octogenarian lifetime, should be heard with apprehensive caution when he proposes modifications.

We now call attention to a few things which must be corrected, or the itinerancy will be seriously impaired and the pastoral office

gradually robbed of its most efficient men.

We glance first at the trite subject of insufficient support. To correct this wrong is vital to our cause. Religion inspires love and solicitude for wife and children, and even a minister may feel himself justified to leave the pastoral work if the Church, having abundant ability, refuse to appropriate a sufficient sum to support and rear his family respectably. So long as the support of the itinerant is so low, and so long as certain vocations related to the pastoral work offer a better compensation, just so long some of our preachers will feel or fancy themselves impelled into collateral paths of duty and service. And we must remember that our danger is increased by the circumstance that these places are now so numerous, and so connected with the Church, that a man need not ignore his call to the ministry by stepping aside to perform a semi-secular duty when he has a prospect of better support.

2. The practice of our people, in some cases, of designating the exclusive man whom they will be willing to receive. This might be entirely justifiable if the preachers were at liberty to designate the only charge they would be willing to receive. But if this course were pursued by the preachers, as it is in some cases by the people, it would disturb the foundations of the itinerant plan. This plan is founded upon the presumed mutual surrender of the right to choose. When one party practically resumes the right, the other should, in sheer justice, be permitted to do the same.

8. A greater evil is that of communicating to the appointing power undefined objections against preachers in an irresponsible way. The sin of this evil, we fear, lies at the door of both ministers and people; but, in either case, the practice is equally rep-

rehensible, and should be discontinued.

4. We must attach to the pastoral office permanent honor. admit this in theory and song, but in practice we contradict our As an abstract proposition, we allow the pastoral work is the highest, sublimest calling of men; and yet we are the persons who talk of taking a man out of the itinerancy and promoting him to a book agency, an editorship, or the presidency of a college! So long as we are guilty of this inconsistency, we will promote the life-blood out of the itinerancy, and dissipate our strength into thin air. The impression is now general, that to go into any of these adjunct places is to go up, while to go out of these places into the pastoral work is to go down. Thus we hold out a temptation, and pay a premium to leave the pastoral worka work which not only looks down upon all secular and semi-secular pursuits of earth, but which soars an eagle's flight above the employment of the angelic hierarchy.

5. The presiding eldership must be preserved intact. We believe the office essential to the integrity of the itinerant plan. There may be a change in the administration and some modifica-

tion in relation to its duties; but the thing itself, as a representative office and a connecting link between the Episcopacy and the pastorate, is indispensable. And we think, if a greater number of charges were grouped together, to reduce expense, and the office judiciously filled, all reasonable persons and true Methodists in the membership would be satisfied. And if the General conference would prescribe definitely a presiding elder's representative duties, and make his work more open and responsible, the ministry would be generally content. This latter change, we think, is demanded by a sense of individual, independent manhood, which lives in every man worthy of the name. There must be openness, consultation, and manifested confidence, somewhere in the whole process of effecting our appointments, to secure a manly and cordial submission to the episcopal prerogative. It is a slanderous imputation upon Methodist preachers, to say that they would not go to hard places, unless the intention to assign them such a lot be Many a Methodist preacher would have trodden a much less thorny pathway through life had he been approached, from time to time, and asked to go to hard places because they were hard places; for then his poor and cheerless allotment would have been, not the index of his standing in his conference, but the index and measure of his great soul.

6. Unrestricted lay delegation can not be admitted without subverting the itinerancy. If the lay element be introduced into our counsels, it is that they may work for their interests. If so, equality of rights would require a corresponding privilege to be granted to the ministry to work among the people for their interests. This would result in negotiation for place and salary directly between the pastor and the people, and itinerancy would be at an end. No reasonable man can suppose that the ministry will submit to any further interference with the appointments than is now practiced. If a restricted lay delegation could be introduced, say one or more from each district, to deliberate on finance, and to represent the secular condition and wants of the district, we see no material objection to it.

7. We believe the limited time a minister may serve a charge without removal might be extended to three years, and yet not diminish, but increase, the efficiency of our system. And this change, we think, ought to be made when the people generally request it. But we think it would look a little immodest in us to effect it, if the people, with their attention called to the subject, do not ask it, and do not desire it.

In conclusion, we submit the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That it is our duty to watch over and preserve the integrity of the itinerancy with a sleepless vigilance.

2. Resolved, That it is the interest of our people to give a more generous support to the ministry, that they may not be impelled to leave the pastoral work for the want of a competent support.

3. Resolved, That we will recommend the next General confer-

ence to provide for the introduction of one or more lay delegates from each presiding elder's district into our annual conferences, to represent the secular condition and wants of the district, and to vote and speak on all financial and general questions.

4. Resolved, That the practice of designating one man exclusively as the only one a charge is willing to receive, is without authority, and breathes insubordination, and is subversive of the itinerant plan.

5. Resolved, That when our people desire changes in our Dissipline, we advise them to accomplish the object by memoralizing the General conference directly, as the more excellent way.

6. Resolved, That the presiding elders should consult freely with the preachers of their districts, respecting their wants and

circumstances affecting their appointments.

- 7. Resolved, That we will ask the General conference so to amend the Discipline as to define, specifically, how, when, and of whom the presiding elder should receive the information, which it is his duty, as a representative officer, to communicate to the Bishop. Also the privileges which the official members may exercise in relation to the men who shall serve them. And also to define how far the ministers concerned may be cognizant of these advisory movements.
- these advisory movements.

 8. Resolved, That we recommend the grouping together of a greater number of charges in each presiding elder's district.

 Also, that the same man be continued in the office but a single term, as a general rule.

9. Resolved, That we will recommend the General conference to allow a preacher to remain three consecutive years in the same charge, when the people generally signify a desire for the

change.

RECAPITULATION.

MEMOIRS.

Rev. James Boyd Austin.

REV. JAMES B. AUSTIN was born in Surry county, N. C., August 16, 1806. His parents were among the early fruits of Methodism in that region; they were deeply pious, and trained up their children in the way they should go. In 1811 the family removed from North Carolina, and settled in Clinton county, Ohio. At the early age of ten years, James experienced "the washing of regeneration and the renewing of the Holy Ghost," and united himself with the Methodist Episcopal Church. He was soon impressed that he was truly called to preach the Gospel. This conviction grew with his growth, and after a long struggle, his mind reached the definite conclusion that he must preach, or lose his own soul. This consideration impelled him forward in the diffidence of his youth. In 1824 he received license to exhort, and in March, 1826, he was employed by Rev. R. Bigelow, presiding elder, as helper on Wilmington circuit. In September, 1826, he was licensed to preach, by order of the Scioto district conference, and was employed as junior preacher on the Straight Creek circuit. In the fall of 1828 he was admitted on trial in the Ohio conference, and appointed to London circuit. His second year he labored on St. Mary's and Defiance mission. Here he suffered from fever and ague so much that his health was well-nigh destroyed, and he was compelled to desist from traveling at the next conference; and not being able to attend the session, he could not be examined and admitted into full connection. In 1830 he was happily married to his present bereaved widow. In 1833 his health was so far restored that he re-entered the itinerant work, and served with great acceptance and usefulness in the following fields of labor-on some two years, and others only one; namely: Lower Sandusky, Defiance, Delaware, Adelphia, Parkersburg station, Belpre, Chester, Logan, and Washington. At the conference in 1848, for want of health, he was placed in a supernumerary relation. In 1849 he was made effective, and appointed to Frankfort; 1850 to Bainbridge; 1851 was supernumerary. In 1852 he was appointed to Clarksville; in 1853 to Batavia. Here his health entirely failed, and he was never able again to do the work of an effective laborer. He, however, continued to do what he could, and frequently He suffered much, and, in submission, he did sometimes express a desire to have health, that he might devote his whole life to the active duties of the ministry.

Many of his fields of labor were not only difficult and hard, but at that period unhealthy. Some idea may be formed of the extent and character of his labors in the second charge assigned him. Early in the conference year he was left alone, except on the occasional visits of Rev. Curtis Godard, his presiding elder. Besides

other points, his mission embraced St. Mary's, Lima, Defiance, and Fort Wayne. During this year the first Methodist society was organized at Fort Wayne.

After he was compelled to desist from the itinerant work, for want of health, he resided some time near Clarksville, Ohio, and

then removed to Logan, where he closed his useful life.

His last illness was inflammation of the stomach and bowels, induced perhaps by a chronic affection of the liver, from which he had long suffered. He was suddenly attacked on the 16th of September, and so violent was the inflammation that it was attended with dreadful spasms. His agony was indescribable, and it was apparent that without speedy relief he must soon die; yet his soul was serene and happy. He requested Rev. B. Mark, the pastor at Logan, to read the 23d Psalm and pray. During this service he was joyful, frequently exclaiming, "Bless the Lord;" "Precious Savior," etc. After prayer he said to brother Mark, "I have a desire to live, if it were the will of the Lord, to do more work for the Church, but if it be otherwise ordered I am perfectly resigned;" adding, "I know the Church can do without me, but I have always felt that I could not do without the Church." He then gave definite instruction in regard to his funeral and the interment of his body. To a friend standing near he said, "I am a great sufferer, but, blessed be God! there remaineth a rest for his children; and he knoweth all my trials." After a pause he added, "I do not now regret that I gave my youth to God, and the prime of my life to the dissemination of Gospel truth. I have toiled hard and suffered much, but if I have been the humble instrument of leading one soul to Christ, I am more than paid for all."

The spasms at length ceased, and he had a respite of several days from this terrible form of suffering. During this period he often spoke of death and eternity with the calmness and resignation of a man of God. To brother Mark he said, "I expect to be saved, not by reason of my own works, but through the merits of

Christ. I feel resigned to the will of God."

On the night of the 25th he was seized with violent vomiting and pain, which continued at short intervals till within a few minutes of his death. During those intervals he spoke of heaven and his bright prospect, often expressing his trust in God. On Saturday night, in all the agonies of dissolving nature, he asked the time, and when told one o'clock, he said, "Holy, precious Sabbath morning." A friend remarked, "You are now entering upon an eternal Sabbath of rest." He replied, "Yes, I trust so." His companion asked if he were conscious of the near approach of death, and if the religion which he had preached to others sustained him in a dying hour? He answered, "O yes." Again he was asked, "Is Christ precious?" He replied, "Yes, precious Christ." These were his last words; but when unable to speak he replied to this same question in the affirmative by three expressive motions of the head.

Thus did our beloved brother and fellow-laborer sweetly fall asleep in Jesus, in soundness of mind and the triumphs of faith, surrounded by his affectionate family and kind friends, at half-past three o'clock, Sunday morning, September 27, 1857.

James Boyd Austin served the Church as a son in the Gospel, allowing those in authority to select all his fields of labor; and I think none ever heard him utter a complaint in relation to any appointment he ever received. He was a plain, practical man, uniformly pious, a good minister of Jesus Christ, and deeply devoted to God and his cause.

Rev. Arthur W. Elliott.

REV. ARTHUR W. ELLIOTT was born in Baltimore county, Maryland, February 22, 1784. At the age of eighteen he crossed the Alleghany Mountains, on a tour to the west, and determined to make the Miami valley his future home. In 1804 he married, and in 1805 returned to Ohio, and settled in Butler county, to remain for life.

In 1806 he was converted, and made a profession of his faith in Christ; his natural gifts, united to his great energy, would not allow him to remain silent, and, impelled by a clear conviction of duty, he entered upon the great work of the ministry, and soon became one of our most efficient pioneer local preachers. In this relation he served God and his Church with great success till the year 1818, when he was admitted into the traveling connection.

The calling of an itinerant Methodist preacher was not easier to him than to others. He left a good position at home; while he had a large family dependent on him for support, he entered and prosecuted this holy vocation, never very lucrative, but then especially limited in its support. His circuits were large and his work oncrous. But as he took eternity into his estimate of the things of time, he persevered with unwavering firmness in his efforts to rescue souls from sin and death. He traveled on horse-back, his circuits being from two to three hundred miles in circumference. On he went through the rain and snow, the frost and mud, carrying with him the glad tidings of salvation, and was every-where welcomed as a successful herald of the cross.

Brother Elliott rapidly rose to eminence and usefulness; his well-marked originality, his fervid eloquence, his great energy, and his burning zeal opening up the sympathies of his hearers, and giving him influence over them for good. He had wonderful power over the multitude, and made astonishing success in protracted and camp meetings, where the thunder of his voice, his daring style, and bold delivery had full scope, and thousands will, doubtless, in the day of eternity, sparkle with the luster of a glorious immortality in the crown of his rejoicing.

In the spring of 1854 he removed to Paris, Illinois, where, broken down in health, and worn out in body, he designed spending the remnant of his days with his children. Late in the fall of 1857 he began to fail more rapidly, and his once iron frame gave way. But he retained his confidence in that God who had, for many years, sustained him in the arduous work he had accomplished. Though suffering extremely, his heart was filled with joy, and the dying Christian triumphed in the strength of his God. His end, which occurred on the 18th January, 1858, was calm and peaceful, affording another proof of the faithfulness with which the Lord performeth his promises to his children.

Rev. William S. Morrow.

REV. WM. S. MORROW was born in Northumberland county, Pennsylvania, October 3, 1804. He was early convinced of sin, under the ministry of Methodist preachers, but was not brought out into the liberty of God's children. In the fall of 1819 he removed to the west, and settled in Ross county, Ohio, and in the spring of 1822 removed to Crawford county. Under the ministry of Rev. Arza Brown, he was, on the 7th of January, 1827, brought to the foot of the cross; and having, in the mean while, joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, was, in March of the same year, clearly justified by faith in Jesus Christ.

His gifts and graces recommended him to positions of usefulness, and he soon held the stations of class-leader, exhorter, and preacher, faithfully and successfully, in each, performing the duties allotted to him. In the fall of 1830 he was regularly admitted into the Ohio conference, and appointed to Darby circuit. In 1831 he was sent to Bellefontaine, and in 1832 to Darby again, where he was married to Miss E. Alexander. He was successively appointed to London, Bellefontaine, Bainbridge, Deer Creek, Delaware, Delaware district, (four years,) West White Oak, Fulton station, Batavia, Milford, Franklin, Wilmington station, York-Street, Cincinnati; Georgetown station, East White Oak, and Cumminsville, to the last of which he received his appointment in September, 1857, and from which he ascended to his reward in heaven, June 19, 1858.

Brother Morrow was successful in his ministry in every essential point. In many of his appointments he had the fruits of his labor in the powerful revival of the work of God. "He was a plain, sound, systematic, unsophisticated minister of the Gospel of Jesus Christ." He was generally, nay, universally, beloved by all who knew him. The peculiar geniality of his temperament endeared him to every one. Among his ministerial brethren especially, none of us had warmer or more numerous friends. With old and young alike he was ever welcome, and he had a cheerful word for all. His last sickness was very painful, and he endured, for about three weeks, great suffering and agony of

body. But it did not disturb his inward jey. His mind dwelt constantly on the delights that satisfied his soul, and he spent many hours in telling his brethren of his rapturous hopes, and in exhorting unconverted friends to seek the same pleasures that made his dying bed the most "heavenly place" of his life. His last words were—"It will soon be over. Jesus is very precious. Glory! glory! victory! victory! victory over death!" And soon afterward his triumphant spirit left the shores of time, and winged its way to the home that Jesus had prepared for him in his Father's house. Thus lived and died one of "nature's noblemen," elevated and sanctified by the love of Jesus.

Rev. J. S. Jackson.

REV. J. S. JACKSON was born in Warren county, Ohio, on the 14th of April, 1883.

In childhood and youth he was remarkable for filial affection and obedience. Ever industrious and truthful, of a sweet and gentle disposition, he possessed the confidence and love of all who knew him.

As early as his thirteenth year he became a partaker of salvation by faith in Christ. Thenceforth his entire conduct was in harmony with his profession. Even at this period, the assiduity and faithfulness which marked his brief ministry showed itself in all his duties as a Christian and a Methodist.

Brother Jackson's early opportunities for education were nothing more than those afforded by common schools of the country, except some four or five months in the Wesleyan University; yet so well did he improve his time and advantages, that at eighteen he was prepared to commence the laborious duties of a professional teacher. In this sphere his success in training the minds was only equaled by that of leading the hearts of his pupils to the knowledge of the Savior.

At length, under a solemn conviction of duty to God and man, he resolved to give himself to the work of the ministry. He was accordingly licensed to preach, and received on trial in the Cincinnati conference, at the session in Ripley, 1856.

His first appointment was to the Winchester circuit, Hillsboro district. Here, though with all the inexperience of an early ministry, such was his knowing zeal, his habits of devotion, his faithfulness in pastoral duty, and the uniform propriety of his life, as to honor and recommend his Master's cause to all around him.

. His second and last appointment was to the New Lexington circuit.

Perhaps few of us repaired to our work from the conference at Piqua more truly in the fullness of the blessing of the Gospel of peace than he. He went with a renewed commission, his heart glowing with heavenly ardors. Indeed, had he known that he stood just upon the threshold of eternity, he could scarcely have

labored with more upotion and power. Two weeks had not passed after his arrival on the circuit, ere it was felt that a messenger of God was in their midst.

It was soon apparent that he was not to labor in vain. At first drops of mercy fell; then showers of blessings, till the entire circuit received the heavenly baptism. Glorious success crowned his efforts. To our dear young brother, these were as the latter rains, and rapidly did he mature for the heavenly world.

rains, and rapidly did he mature for the heavenly world.

On Saturday, March 13th, associated with his colleague, he began his last toils in a protracted meeting. Tuesday following he complained of a slight indisposition, yet still labored with unabating zeal. Thursday evening, though much worse, he was still at his post. Having sung that beautiful hymn; commencing,

"There is a land of pure delight," etc.,

he spoke in a familiar but most heavenly manner of that happy land. On Friday morning, being much worse, he tore himself from his beloved work, and returned to his boarding house to die.

He lingered nine days, most of the time in a stupor, conversing but little. Monday morning, March 29th, he breathed out his life in the arms of Jesus. His sun set at noon, but cloudless and serene. A short time before he expired his mother asked him of his hopes and prospects. A sweet smile played over his face as he replied, "Mother, it is all bright, bright."

As a young man, brother Jackson was remarkably modest and unassuming. As a Christian, he was devoted, humble, and full of faith. Seldom have I known one whose Christian character possessed more purity and symmetry. He professed holiness and lived it. As a preacher, he would not be called profound or brilliant; but there was a purity, an evangelism, a sweet simplicity about his sermons, that both pleased and profited. He was rapidly accumulating the elements of power, and would soon have become a most useful minister. But God is wiser than we. Submissively we bow, and look forward to a reunion where the pang of separation is unknown.

Rev. J. J. Tiffany.

JOHN JOSEPH TIFFANY was born June 1, 1826, at Dighton, near Huddersfield, Yorkshire, England. At the age of one year his parents brought him to America; settling first in Orange county, N. Y., then in Sullivan county, N. Y., and finally, in 1831, in Oxford, Butler county, Ohio. Having pursued the ordinary English branches in the common schools, he completed his education at Miami University, where he graduated with honor in 1850. His piety and talents had previously attracted the attention of the Church in Oxford, and in obedience to the universal voice of his brethren, he was called to the local ministry. His license to exhort bears date December 20, 1848, and his license to preach, April 21, 1849.

In 1850 he was received on trial by the Ohio conference, and sent to Bainbridge circuit. Failing health, however, compelled him to relinquish this field of labor, and he returned to his father's house, where he remained for several years. During this period he labored in the Sabbath school, the class-room, and the pulpit, as his strength would permit. Part of the time he was employed, by presiding elder's appointment, as an assistant upon Middletown and Urbana stations. In 1855 he was again received on trial by the Cincinnati conference, and sent to Cumminsville. In 1856 he was appointed to New-Street charge, Cincinnati. During this year he made a trip to England, but his health, instead of being improved thereby, was still further injured. In consequence, he was compelled, at the ensuing session of conference, to take a supernumerary relation. His value as a man and as a minister, induced the conference to take the novel action of receiving him into full connection, although he was immediately assigned to the supernumerary list. He died December 29, 1857.

Such is a brief outline of the life of our departed brother. His character was in every way lovely. His manners were gentle and winning, and his spirit meek and quiet. One of his pastors has expressed the opinion that he came nearer to perfection than any human being he had ever known. It was the privilege of the writer to be associated with him during his college course, and it affords the highest gratification to bear testimony to the unsullied purity of his life, and the fervency of his religious zeal in the midst of the associations of college life. His colleagues in the ministry unite in the same testimony; and to the people whom

he has served, his memory will ever be precious.

His preaching abilities were more than respectable, but the feebleness of his body prevented their full expression and development. The Holy Spirit, however, supplied this lack by a peculiar unction and power which gave him many seals to his ministry. His death was unexpected at the time, and there have been communicated to the committee no dying words or memorials of his Christian feelings in the close of his career. But as he has all along been living in reference to heaven, and has so often expressed his triumphant faith in Christ, we have perfect confidence that he is now one of the just made perfect in heaven.

Rev. Rebert O. Spencer.

In the winding up of the conference year, a cloud of sadness was thrown over our ranks by the sudden and unexpected announcement of the death of our beloved brother, ROBERT O. SPENCER.

He was born at Columbia, Ohio, February 10, 1806. Having embraced religion in the eleventh year of his age, he commenced preaching when only seventeen—was admitted on trial into the

Ohio annual conference in the fall of 1824, and appointed to Brush Creek circuit. His guileless spirit and purity of life soon installed him in the affections of his brethren, and rendered him a general favorite of the Church. In 1825 he was appointed to Milford, and the following year to Oxford circuit. During 1827 and 1828 he traveled Athens circuit, and labored successfully in the great revival that broke out among the students of the Ohio University, which resulted in sending forth into the field such taborers as E. R. Ames, J. M. Trimble, and many others scarcely less eminent for piety and usefulness. Here, also, in the fall of 1828 he was joined in marriage to Jacinthia Jewett, who still survives to mourn her loss.

As he advanced in manhood, although retaining to some extent the timidity and sensibility of his youth, he promptly grasped and faithfully executed every division of the work that was committed to his care. In 1829 and 1830 he was reappointed to Oxford, and then successively filled the following appointments: Hamilton, Columbus, Charleston, Va.; Kanawha district, (two years,) Chillicothe, Urbana district, (three years,) Zanesville district, (four years,) Marietta district, (two years,) Columbus district, (two years.) In 1848 he was appointed to Ninth-Street, Cincinnati; 1849, to Fulton; 1850, to Asbury Chapel. The three following years he traveled Portsmouth district; was appointed to Piqua in 1854; to Park-Street, Cincinnati, in 1855 and 1856, and the last two years to Oxford, where, his health failing, he was compelled, early in the spring, to desist from active ministerial labor.

During the summer he regained his elasticity of spirits, and became so materially improved in health that he fully expected to be able to take regular work at the ensuing conference. Contrary to all expectation, however, about two weeks previous to the time of holding its session he was suddenly taken down by a violent attack of bilious colic, attended with inflammation of the bowels. In a day or two he was pronounced to be convalescent by his physician; and although he himself had a presentiment from the first that the disease would prove fatal, little or no fear was entertained with regard to his recovery. But on the evening of the 27th of August, a change for the worse was perceived; mortification set in, and all hope was abandoned. Though his sufferings at times were excruciating in the extreme, he bore them all, without a murmur or complaint, till the morning of the 30th, when, without a struggle or a groan, he sweetly fell asleep in Jesus.

The last ministerial duty which he performed and finished on the bed of death was the preparation of a missionary discourse, to be delivered before the annual conference, closing with that solemn, prophetic, and, may we not say in view of the issue, divinely-directed prayer, "Even so, come, Lord Jesus, and come quickly." Having completed it, he placed the manuscript beneath his dying pillow, while ever and anon, as his mind wandered, various portions of it would fall incoherently from his lips. The dying saint had not only a last duty to perform, but a dying legacy to bequeath to his brethren in the ministry. This is his soul-cheering testimony: "Though I may die, blessed be God, I am now ready. My work is done. The Gospel I have preached unto others, for more than thirty-five years, has been the power of God to my own salvation. I do not regret that I embraced religion in early youth, and gave myself to the ministry in my seventeenth year." There is a volume of instruction in these words, "I do not regret." Born in the lap of affluence, and cradled amid the luxuries of wealth, yet scarcely had the tear of repentance dried upon his beardless cheek, before, like Him who was meek above all men, he chose rather "to suffer affliction with the people of God" than to enjoy the pleasures of this life for a season.

Shortly before his death he requested his friends to sing,

"O, land of rest, for thee I sigh;"

and, attempting to join them, he became exceedingly happy. Suddenly his whole countenance kindled up with a heavenly smile, and became luminous and radiant, as if it had been that of an angel, while he shouted, "Salvation unto God and to the Lamb forever."

At another time, turning to his brother-in-law, a veteran Christian, whose release is near at hand, he exclaimed, "Soon, very soon, my dear brother, we shall stand on Zion's hill together." When nearing the river of death he was asked by his brethren if all was right. He answered, "Yes; all is well, I shall soon be at home."

"O may we triumph so,
When all our warfare's past,
And, dying, find our latest foe
Under our feet at last!"

As a man he was eminently modest. Unobtrusive and retiring, he was not one to seek after position, but ever preferring others to himself, he was content to stand in the vestibule till the Master of ceremonies should say, "Friend, come up higher."

He was an exceedingly sensitive man, sensitive almost to a fault. The slightest apparent coldness or neglect on the part of a friend caused him not a little disquietude, while the unexplained absence of a single member of his congregation would be the source to him of ever-increasing anxiety till he had ascertained the cause.

He was one of the most conscientious of men, conscientious in little things as well as great. Even in cases of doubtful morality, no persuasion could induce him to act contrary to his conscientious convictions. One might say of him what Pyrrhus said of

Fabricius, "It would be easier to turn the sun from his course than him from the path of his integrity."

He was a very laborious man. "Never unemployed, never triffingly employed," his labors always commenced with the early

dawn, and ordinarily did not close till the noon of night.

As a Christian, he was deeply devoted and unaffectedly pious. He spent much of his time upon his knees, not only in prayer, but in the study of the sacred Scriptures. Seven times a day would he retire to some secret place to commune with God and consult his divine oracles. He would allow nothing to interfere with these devotions. During the past summer, while engaged in the harvest-field, with the hope of recruiting his health, he might be seen, when there was no other resort, prostrate with his face upon the ground, earnestly pleading with God in prayer. Liberal beyond his means, he never blew his charities through a trumpet, but with an unobtrusive benevolence, he sought out the widow and the fatherless, and made them the objects of his frequent benefactions. Generous and unsuspecting, he always carried his heart in his hand, and with the simplicity of a child threw the arms of his Christian affection, without regard to sect or station in life, around all who bore the impress of his Savios. By the genuineness of his Christian example he commanded the respect and admiration of all with whom he associated; while the godly example of his every-day life preached with a trumpettongued eloquence that none could gainsay and but few withstand.

As a minister he was a good preacher and a faithful pastor. His manner in the pulpit was grave and dignified; his style plain and perspicuous; his voice, notwithstanding a slight impediment in his speech, was of great compass and power; while his sermons, in their methodical arrangement, argumentative strength, soundness of doctrine, and practical application, were fine specimens of evangelical preaching. As a pastor he had few equals, perhaps no superiors. Here was his forte, and here he intrenched himself deeply in the hearts of his congregations.

With an ever-sleepless vigilance did he watch over the flock of Christ, guarding every avenue against the entrance of the prowling wolf, taking up the little lambs and folding them in his arms, encouraging the timid, strengthening the weak, chiding gently the straying, and comforting the dying. Many, very many, are the precious souls that, in the day of eternity, as the fruit of his labors, shall sparkle as jewels in his crown of everlasting rejoicing.

NOTE.

The following stations are not marked with either district or charge, and hence it became impossible for the committee to assign them their regular place with the others. He can do no better than to append them in this form. Brethren should be very careful to write their reports in a small book, or on a large sheet or sheets attached together, and not on separate slips of paper in such pencil marks as are made in taking the collection. 
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
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

RULES OF ORDER.

1. AFTER the usual opening religious exercises, the Secretary shall read the minutes of the previous session.

2. No motion shall be entertained by the conference, till such

motion shall have been seconded.

3. All motions shall be reduced to writing, if desired by any member of the conference.

4. Every member desiring to speak on any subject before the conference, shall rise and address the President.

5. The member who first rises and addresses the President shall be entitled to the floor.

6. No member shall speak more than once on the same subject till all who may desire to speak shall have spoken; nor more than fifteen minutes at a time, without leave of conference.

7. All questions of order shall be decided by the President.

subject to an appeal to the conference, without debate.

8. When any question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, to postpone, to commit or to amend; but a motion to adjourn shall always be in order; and this, as well as a motion to lay on the table, shall be decided without debate.

9. If the question before the conference be capable of division, upon the call of any member, such question shall be divided.

10. The business of the conference shall be conducted with open doors, unless otherwise ordered by the conference.

11. Any question may be reconsidered on the motion of any

member who may have voted with the majority.

12. If any member call for the previous question, and such call be sanctioned by a two-thirds vote of the conference, the

main question shall then be put.

13. Each committee of the conference shall choose its own chairman, unless the chairman be designated by the conference

or the President in the appointment of the committee.

14. The members of the conference shall assemble in the conference room punctually at the hour to which the conference adjourned, and no member shall absent himself from the place of conference session without leave of absence.

15. In all practicable cases, when charges are preferred against a member of conference, notice shall be given to the President on the first day of the session, that, if it be judged proper, his name may be called, and the case referred to a committee.

RESOLUTIONS OF CONFERENCE.

Slavery.

- 1. Resolved, by the Cincinnati annual conference, in conference assembled, That we concur in the recommendation of the Erie annual conference to so change our General Rule on slavery that it shall read: "The buying, selling, holding, or transferring, of any human being, to be used in slavery." Adopted by 188 to 10.
- 2. Resolved, That we recommend the suspension of the Fourth Restrictive Rule, for the purpose specified in the foregoing resolution. Adopted by 119 to 8.

3. Resolved, That we recommend that the chapter on Slavery be so altered as to conform it to the proposed change of the said rule, containing the following words: "OF SLAVERY:

What shall be done for the extirpation of the evil of "Quest.

slavery?

"Answer 1. We declare that we are as much as ever convinced

of the great evil of slavery.

"2. Our colored preachers and official members shall have all the privileges which are usual to others in the district and quarterly conferences. And the presiding elder may hold for them a separate district conference when the number of colored local preachers will justify it.

"3. The bishops may employ colored preachers to travel and preach, when their services are judged necessary: provided, that no one shall be so employed without having been recommended

by a quarterly conference.

- 4. Resolved, That, inasmuch as "the great evil of slavery" still remains, notwithstanding the strong expression of anxiety for its "extirpation," and inasmuch as even now, after all the discussion and legislation by our Church on this question, it is, perhaps, as difficult to convict and exclude a member for the sin of slavery as it would have been at any time during the last third of a century, it is our sober and profound conviction that we must not any longer give place to equivocations or compromises.
- And therefore,
 5. Resolved, That we hereby instruct our delegates to the next General conference to secure, if possible, the action recommended in the foregoing resolutions; and, in the event this can not be done by them, that we hereby further instruct them to co-operate with the delegates from other annual conferences, to secure such action as shall most speedily and effectually free the Church from the "complicated villainy" of slaveholding, and even from all complicity with it.

Missions.

1. Resolved, That we, as preachers of the Cincinnati conference, will do all in our power to introduce and carry out into practical operation more fully the plan of the Discipline for the collection of funds for the support of missions; and in connection therewith will hold a concert of prayer for missions on the first weekly prayer meeting in every month.

2. Resolved, That we exert ourselves to circulate the Missionary Advocate, that information may be diffused and interest

awakened in the cause of missions.

3. Resolved, That we propose \$16,000 as the amount to be raised within our bounds for the general missionary treasury the coming year, being about 50 cts. per member.

German Conference.

Whereas, we believe that that part of the German work of the Methodist Episcopal Church, which has been connected with this conference for the last twenty-four years, may be made still more efficient in its soul-saving influence upon the German population, by being set apart as a separate annual conference; and

Whereas, in our annual sessions there is not sufficient time for the consideration of questions intimately and vitally connected

with the peculiar wants of the German work; therefore,

Resolved, That we recommend to the General conference to form the German stations, circuits, and missions, connected with the Cincinnati conference, into a separate conference, by the name of the "Cincinnati German annual conference."

Bible Society.

Resolved, That we most cordially approve the aims of the American Bible Society; and that we will co-operate, as heretofore, with its agents in the collection of funds and in the distribution of the word of God in all parts of our work.

Lay Delegation.

- 1. Resolved, That it will afford us real pleasure to have our lay brethren in as close connection and sympathy with us as possible, that they may share more fully in our labors, honors, and successes.
- 2. Resolved, That we have entire confidence in the ability and prudence of our lay brethren to conduct the present discussion, and believe they are, with but few exceptions, so true to Methodism, and appreciative of our ecclesiastical order, that they will seek only such changes as they believe will increase and not diminish the effectiveness of our present plan.

3. Resolved, That we comply with the respectful request of the Laymen's Convention in the following preamble and resolutions:

Resolved, That the annual conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, now in session in this place, be, and is hereby solicited by this Convention to direct the presiding elders to present to the members of the second quarterly meeting conference, held in their respective districts, the following preamble and resolution, and, at the close of said meetings, to return to the President of this Association, and to the Secretary of the conference, certified copies of their action, and that the Secretary of the conference send them to the General conference:

conference send them to the General conference:

"Whereas, we, the members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, believe that lay representation in our annual and General conferences would diffuse a salutary influence throughout our Church organization, and ultimately prove an efficient auxiliary in furthering the success of Methodism; therefore,

"Resolved, That, in our opinion, the next General conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church should so alter the disciplinary rule of our Church as to admit a suitable lay delegation into

annual and General conferences."

On the Stewards.

Resolved, That this conference appoint a board of stewards for the ensuing year, consisting of one from each district, who shall, together with the lay members of the Financial Committee, be requested to collect information as to the temporal condition of the conference claimants in his district, and that this board shall perform, ex officio, all the duties of the Committee on Necessitous Cases.

Resolved, That the lay members of the Committee co-operate with the stewards in making the discrimination among claimants.

Resolved, That the conference stewards, in preparing a duplicate of their report for the conference minutes, be instructed to note, in a separate column, in all cases of deficiency, the societies and the several charges where such deficiencies exist.

Resolved, That each member of the conference be requested to report, in person or by letter, to the chairman of the board of stewards, the names of his children under fourteen years of age, with the date of their birth, to be entered upon a register by the recording steward.

On Itinerancy and Pastoral Office.

1. Resolved, That it is our duty to watch over and preserve the itinerancy.

2. Resolved, That it is the duty of the people to give a more generous support to the ministry, that they may not be impelled to leave the pastoral work for the want of a competent support.

3. Resolved, That the practice of designating one man exclusively as the only one a charge is willing to receive, is without authority, and breathes the spirit of insubordination; and that the refusal of a people to receive a minister, or of a minister to serve a people after appointment, is subversive of good order and the itinerant plan, and to be earnestly deprecated by every lover of Methodist economy.

4. Resolved, That when our people desire changes in our Discipline, we advise them to memorialize the General conference as

the best way to obtain their object.

5. Resolved, That the presiding elders should consult freely with the preachers of their districts respecting their wants, and the circumstances affecting their appointments.

6. Resolved, That we recommend the increase of the number

of charges in each presiding elder's district.

7. Resolved, That we firmly disapprove of special transfers to the conference to gratify the demands of any particular charge, and that our bishops are affectionately requested not to inflict injustice and mortification on the ministers and charges of this conference, by yielding to any anti-Methodistic proceedings requiring such transfer.

8. Resolved, That the same man should be continued in the

presiding elder's office but one term, as a general rule.

In pursuance of your resolutions of last year, your Committee recommend the following:

That the Cincinnati annual conference memorialize the Gen-

eral conference as follows:

- 1. Resolved, That the General conference be, and is hereby requested to define specifically how, when, and of whom the presiding elder should receive the information, which it is his duty, as a representative officer, to communicate to the bishop; also, how far the ministers concerned may be cognizant of all advisory movements affecting their appointments; and, also, the privileges which the official members of a charge may exercise in relation to the man who shall serve them, particularly as to their rejection.
- 2. Resolved, That we hereby request the General conference so to amend the rule on the subject, as to allow a minister to remain three consecutive years in the same charge, when the people generally request such change of the rule.

On Class Meetings.

1. Resolved, That we not only reaffirm the action of last year upon the subject of class meetings, but hereby instruct our delegates to the next General conference to resist any attempt, should it be made, to abolish or materially modify the rule on class meetings, except it be to bring up the practice of the Church to harmonize with existing regulations.

2. Resolved, That a want of strictly observing our rules as to receiving members on trial and into full connection, has been a fruitful source of the evil touching the non-attendance upon class, as it has brought within the pale of the Church those who have no experimental knowledge of Christ, and never had a deep-seated desire for salvation.

3. Resolved, That presiding elders and preachers in charge be requested to enforce the rule on attendance on class meetings.

Bishop Morris.

Conference adopted the following unanimously, by a rising vote:

Resolved, That this conference highly appreciates the long and faithful services of our able and worthy Superintendent, Bishop Morris, and that we most cordially and affectionately invite him still to continue his residence among us.

Resolved, by the members of the Cincinnati conference, in conference assembled, That the publication of the Life of the late Rev. W. H. Raper is highly desirable, and that we respectfully request Rev. John F. Wright to prepare such memoir for publication.

To Defray Expenses of Delegates.

Resolved, That a collection be taken in every circuit and station, in January, 1860, to defray expenses of delegates to the General conference. [These collections should be handed over to one of the delegates from this conference.]

Resolved, That the Secretary publish the meetings of the Committees of Examination and the classes, on Tuesday morning, at eight o'clock, preceding the next conference session.

Resolved, That the ministers of this conference be respectfully requested to preserve, for future use, the plans of their respective circuits and stations.

Stock in Xenia Female Academy.

Brother Lowrey was appointed to secure the certificate of stock of the Xenia Female Academy, belonging to this conference, in the name of the Secretary of the conference and his successor in office.

This noble institution now seems to be established upon a basis of permanent prosperity; each year in its history is adding some new element to its means of success.

So well fitted is it to secure all those noble objects for which it was founded, that none need fear committing their sons to the educational and moral training of this institution. One feature in the instruction of this University we would call especial attention to; it is, that students are required rather to master the subject of their study than merely the text-book.

There has been added, during the year, a valuable addition to the Cabinet of Natural History. It is estimated, by those who are competent to judge, that it is worth thousand dollars; but, under the good management of Prof. Merrick, it has been secured to the University for about half that sum.

The grounds and buildings are in a state of good repair. Each year adds something to their convenience and tastefulness. And if our people will only render the aid now called for by the necessities of the institution and by the Board of Trustees, the institution will be still further and better prepared to carry out the noble objects for which it was founded.

2. Resolved, That the presiding Bishop be requested to reappoint Rev. L. D. M'Cabe, D. D., Professor in the Ohio Wesleyan University.

3. Resolved, That William I. Ellsworth and William G. W. Lewis be appointed the Visiting and Examining Committee for the ensuing year.

Wesleyan Female College, Cincinnati, Ohie.

Your Committee present all the information that has come before them on this institution, which is simply a financial report. The following extract from the minutes of the Board of Trus-

A report to the present date, while it might vary the items, would alter the result very little.

2. Resolved, That we recommend the appointment of the presiding elders of the Cincinnati districts, and pastors of Park-Street and Asbury charges, as the Visiting and Examining Committee for the ensuing year.

3. Resolved, That we recommend the appointment of the Rev. Robert Allyn as President of the institution.

Wilberforce University.

The classes evinced commendable progress in their studies—showing the results of thorough discipline and patient toil on the part of the President and his assistants.

The written essays, addresses, and dialogues, were worthy of

emphatic commendation, and would have conferred honor upon any institution of learning of the same grade.

The vocal and instrumental music was of a high order, and might challenge competition, with safety, in this department, in which the sons and daughters of Africa so naturally excel.

President Rust is the very man for the place he occupies; and we deem it very fortunate for the interests of the University, that his valuable services have been secured in this benevolent enterprise.

The buildings and grounds are in good repair, and are admira-

bly adapted to the purpose to which they are appropriated.

The Board of Trustees promptly complied with the request of the conference and elected eight members of their Board from the names furnished by the Cincinnati conference, and they agreed to elect the same number from the Ohio conference as soon as vacancies occur in the Board; and did elect two members from the list of names furnished by said conference. The whole number of Trustees is 23, of whom two-thirds are members of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

We append the following synopsis of the financial condition of the institution, and take great pleasure in announcing the fact, that the Board have secured the valuable services of Rev. Uriah Heath, of the Ohio conference, as sole Agent of the University; and we commend him and his cause to the Church and all interested in the glorious enterprise of educating and elevating the colored population of our country.

The financial report was presented by brother Moody, and is as follows:

Of the above assets \$2,700 are conditional; the condition being that six thousand dollars shall be raised; and there is a fair prospect that the six thousand will be raised. If we deduct this \$2,700 from the assets of \$8,946, it leaves the real assets of the institution \$6,700; deduct the amount from the whole debt of \$11,904.38, will leave the real debt \$5,204.38.

Your Committee recommend for adoption the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That the presiding Bishop be requested to reappoint the Rev. R. S. Rust President of the institution the ensuing year.

2. Resolved, That brothers J. M. Leavitt and John T. Mitchell be appointed the Visiting and Examining Committee the ensuing

year.

Whereas, the Board of Trustees of the Wilberforce University has adopted the following, namely: "Resolved, That the members of the Cincinnati conference are most earnestly requested to labor in their several charges, as far as possible, among the colored people to awaken in them a desire for education and general improvement, and specially to direct their attention to the University as affording the means of education, and interest them in its objects;" therefore,

Resolved, by the Cincinnati conference, That we will comply with the request of the Board of Trustees as far as we may have opportunity, and commend the noble institution to the attention and patronage of the colored people, who may be within our bounds, and labor otherwise for their improvement and elevation.

2. Resolved, That we will welcome the Agent of Wilberforce University, Rev. Uriah Heath, to our respective fields of labor, and aid as well as encourage him in his work of raising funds for the institution.

Springfield Female College.

The Visiting and Examining Committee to this institution report the examinations of a highly-satisfactory character. In the department of music it is thought the institution will compare favorably with any institution, east or west. A number of young ladies completed the course of study and received the honors of the institution.

The Board of Trustees presented a full financial report, which shows the institution to be about three thousand dollars in debt. But no plan is suggested or hope expressed for its early removal.

Your Committee recommend for adoption the following resolutions:

Resolved, That we recommend the institution to the patronage of the Church and public generally.

Resolved, That the presiding Bishop be requested to reappoint the Rev. John W. Weakley, D. D., to the Presidency of the institution the ensuing year.

Resolved, That the presiding elder of Urbana district and the stationed preachers of Springfield stations be the Visiting and Examining Committee for the ensuing year.

Xenia Female College.

The estimated value of the buildings and grounds is \$15,000; the amount of debt on the same, \$2,500; to meet which the Board of Trustees have available subscription notes to the amount of something over \$1,800, with a fair prospect of raising the entire amount in a few months.

The debt unprovided for is now but \$700. From this repre-

sentation it will be seen that the institution is in a healthy financial condition. Nor are its prospects in other respects less flattering. The Board of Trustees are more than satisfied with the President, Prof. Smith, and feel that under his judicious management all that the most sanguine friends of the institution have hoped for will be realized.

Your Committee recommend the adoption of the following reso-

lutions:

1. Resolved, That we cordially recommend the institution to

the Church and public generally.

2. Resolved, That the presiding elder of Xenia district, the preacher in charge of Xenia station, and Revs. Braden and Merrick, be appointed a Visiting and Examining Committee for the present year.

Hillsboro Female College.

The Committee on Education beg leave to report, in part:

The Examining and Visiting Committee appointed for this institution for the past year, report the exercises connected with the examinations and commencement of peculiar interest; that the graduating class was composed of seven young ladies, all of whom acquitted themselves with marked ability.

The whole examination is represented as giving unmistakable evidence of well-trained minds on the part of the pupils, and shilty and skill on the part of the teachers. Your Committee is also gratified to report, that a deep religious feeling has prevailed in the College throughout the year, and that many of the young ladies have been made wise unto salvation.

Your Committee would call especial attention to the catalogue

of this institution as being very full and satisfactory.

It is a matter of deep regret that an institution combining so many advantages, and so well conducted as this has been, for a long series of years, should be so embarrassed in its finances.

The President of the Board of Trustees has very kindly and properly furnished your Committee with a full report of its financial condition. In that report it is set forth that the institution owed on the 23d day of June, 1859, seventeen thousand two hundred and twenty-five dollars. Since then thirteen thousand dollars have been subscribed upon the condition that the sum of twenty thousand dollars shall be secured-including the thirteen thousand—for the purpose of paying off the debts of the institution; thus leaving about five thousand dollars unprovided for. The Board of Trustees institute the inquiry: How can this amount be provided for? and set forth, that unless the conference can loan them that amount, from some fund under its control, or the preachers will bring the matter before their several charges, that this valuable property, worth forty-eight thousand dollars, inclu-

ding buildings, grounds, apparatus, cabinets, and library, will be a total loss.

Your Committee is of opinion that the last-named suggestion is wholly impracticable, and as to the first, it is enough to say the conference has no fund under its control to apply.

The facts show clearly that the friends of education, in the immediate vicinity of the College, have done nobly, and are worthy of aid from abroad, if in giving that aid we did not enter the territory legitimately belonging to other institutions, also involved. But all our institutions are so involved in debt, and have so frequently canvassed the territory in their immediate vicinities, that it is believed it would be wholly impracticable to go beyond the immediate neighborhood of this institution for aid in its behalf.

There are four thousand Methodists in Highland county, owning 70 churches and one-fifth of the taxable property of the county. Will they let this noble institution, second to none in its management and course of study, that has done so much to give character to the county-seat of the county and the county itself, fail for the want of five thousand dollars? Your Committee think not; but believe if the remaining five thousand dollars could be borrowed for a few years, so as to give the friends a little rest, they would then respond readily and cordially to a call in behalf of the institution and deliver it from its embarrassment. Your Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That the following-named persons be appointed Trustees for the ensuing year: Jas. H. Thompson, J. J. Dryden, Henry Turner, Jos. H. Mullenix, Enos Horner, Wm. M. Meek, John L. Hughes, Jacob Saylor.

2. Resolved, That the conference respectfully request the presiding Bishop to appoint the Rev. Jos. M'D. Mathews, D. D., President of the institution the ensuing year.

3. Resolved, That the presiding elder of Hillsboro district, preachers of Hillsboro station and Highland circuit, be appointed the Visiting and Examining Committee for the ensuing year.

4. Resolved, That the Cincinnati conference most heartily commends this institution to the patronage of the Church and W. I. ELLSWORTH, Chairman.

Linden Hill Academy.

There was before your Committee a lengthy communication from representatives of Linden Hill Academy, located at New Carlisle, Clark county, Ohio.

This Academy is now owned by the Rev. Thomas Harrison, who proposes to sell it to a board of trustees composed of members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and that board propose, as soon as all the debts are removed, to put it under the control and patronage of the Cincinnati conference—the conference to appoint a Principal—whenever the Board may elect one of the members of the conference—and to do all things that are usual for the conference to do in reference to such institutions. The property consists of six acres of ground, with a substantial brick building 65 by 40 feet, two stories high. The Academy has been in existence seven years, and has had an annual attendance of 140 students. In view of the interests of our Church in that locality, your Committee would recommend the reception of the institution, under the restrictions set forth in the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That the Cincinnati conference will receive the Linden Hill Academy under its control and patronage upon the following conditions:

(1.) That at the time of its reception it shall be entirely free

from debt.

(2.) That all the members of the Board of Trustees shall forever

be members of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

(3.) That two-thirds of the Board of Trustees shall be elected by the Cincinnati conference, the Board of Trustees having the right to nominate.

(4.) That the Board of Trustees shall never involve the property in debt, by improvements or otherwise, without the consent of

the Cincinnati conference.

2. Resolved, That the presiding elder of Xenia district and the preacher in charge of New Carlisle circuit be appointed to carry out the first resolution, and report to the next annual conference.

REPORT ON TRACT CAUSE.

Your Committee respectfully report that they have duly considered the interests of the Tract Cause as referred to them, and recemmend the most zealous co-operation with the Book Concern, in the circulation of these winged messengers of light, and love, and moral power, in all our fields of labor.

Every pastor, class-leader, and Sabbath school teacher should be supplied with tracts on doctrinal, experimental, practical, and ecclesiastical subjects, and use them as occasion may require "for doctrine, reproof, correction, and instruction in righteeusness," and for the statemen and defense of the peculiarities of our

economy.

REPORT ON PARSONAGES.

Your Committee would respectfully report, according to best information, that within the bounds of the Cincinnati annual conference we have only about sixty-five parsonages, leaving upward of fifty circuits and stations destitute of even a place to shelter a minister and his family. And we farther regret that of the above sixty-five parsonages nearly one-half are unfit residences for the families that are expected to occupy them.

Hence, out of the whole number of charges in our conference, upward of two-thirds are left without a comfortable home for the preacher's family.

Having these facts before us, your Committee would submit

the following resolutions for your action:

1. Resolved, That it is the opinion of this conference that the preachers who shall be appointed to those circuits and stations that have no parsonages, should take immediate and energetic action to secure, by purchase or erection, suitable parsonages with heavy furniture.

2. Resolved, That we earnestly request and affectionately advise our people to co-operate with their ministers in this import-

ant enterprise, and thereby wipe away their reproach.

3. Resolved, That the above direction, etc., be equally applicable to circuits and stations whose parsonages are not suitable residences.

4. Resolved, That we advise and kindly request the presiding elder of each district to introduce this subject, and read this report, and urgo its resolutions in his first quarterly conference, and, if possible, secure the co-operation of its members.

5. Resolved, That this report be published in the Western Christian Advocate and the Christian Apologist, and in the

Minutes.

REPORT ON FINANCE.

THE Committee on Finance respectfully report:

That, after carefully considering "the plan of finance" of this conference, and noting its practical workings where it has been adopted and its details carried out, we think we have as little cause as disposition to suggest any alteration in its provisions at this time. We are convinced it is well calculated to secure the important objects proposed, if seasonably and heartily adopted, and skillfully and faithfully applied in our respective charges.

It has long since been demonstrated that willing hearts, combined with active and diligent hands, guarantee success in all proper and practicable objects. Nothing is more congenial to the truly-pious and well-instructed mind, than that liberality and fidelity to the high and varied claims of ministerial support and Christian benevolence so essential to the prosperity of the Church.

The whole-hearted Christian needs only to know and fully appreciate the duties and privileges of his high and holy calling; and guided thereby, neither personal nor family convenience or interests will be permitted to countenance or work delinquency in

this our common stewardship.

We think it inexpedient to change the plan till it has been more generally adopted and more fully tested, feeling assured, that, with proper trial, it will produce the appropriate results. The prevailing conviction that a self-sacrificing and laborious ministry are entitled to a cordial and competent support, combined with the increasing disposition and ability of our people to raise and keep their ministers above embarrassment, inspires us with confidence as to the continued improvement of the finances of our conference.

Your Committee would most kindly, but earnestly, recommend to our brethren of the ministry and laity throughout our work, the adoption and faithful working of this plan, till its benefits

shall be realized in all our charges.

All that we know of fallen or redeemed humanity can not fail to impress us with the conviction that the prosperity of the Church is very intimately connected with such provision for the ministry as the people are now so fully able to afford them. We can not doubt a plan so equitable and efficient will continue to receive the hearty sanction and support of all lovers of progress, both in the temporal and spiritual interests of our beloved Zion.

With this brief expression of our views, your Committee re-

spectfully offer for your adoption the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That the members of this conference, in conjunction with the local ministry, be requested to preach on the obligations of ministerial support, and "systematic benevolence," at least once a year in all our appointments, kindly and faithfully enforcing these obligations upon all classes as God may afford the means and indicate the claims.

2. Resolved, That the leaders and stewards in our charges are affectionately and earnestly requested to aid the ministry in their efforts to explain and enforce these obligations upon those of limited means, and especially upon those having abundance, that there may be equality and success.

8. Resolved, That the Estimating Committee be requested to consult the preacher as to the amount needed for his support,

before making the estimate.
4. Resolved, That the Estimating Committee be requested to make special provision for horse-keeping for those preachers who need to keep a horse for their work in the circuit or district.

Financial Plan.

1. There shall be a meeting of all the stewards and leaders, and the Estimating Committee, in each church and station, to be held at such time and place as the last quarterly meeting conference of the preceding year shall appoint, or, in case no appointment is made by the quarterly meeting conference, shall meet at the call of the preacher in charge, in which meeting the preacher in charge shall preside. It shall be the duty of this meeting to ascertain the entire amount of claims upon the circuit or station for the support of the ministry, and apportion to each society or class the amount required of them quarterly, according to their members, abilities, and ministerial services they receive, as far as The committee appointed to estimate the allowance practicable. of the preachers shall report to the financial meeting the amount agreed upon, which report shall be approved or amended by the financial meeting; and in case the quarterly meeting conference shall find it necessary to change the amount agreed upon, then the financial meeting shall so change their apportionment as to conform it to the action of the quarterly conference.

2. The financial meeting shall divide the societies and classes as equally as possible, and give each steward his portion of the work. The stewards shall be careful that the people are properly instructed, and that the collectors and leaders are faithful and prompt in the performance of their duties. For the performance of these duties the stewards shall be held to a strict account by

their quarterly meeting conference.

3. That it shall be the duty of each steward to call a meeting of the leaders of his district as soon after the financial meeting as practicable, at which he shall report the amount apportioned to each society in his district, and the leaders shall apportion the same among the several classes according to numbers and ability to pay; also, the leader or class steward may select some member of the class to solicit aid from persons not members of our Church, but who attend upon our ministry, if it is deemed advisable.

4. That at each quarterly meeting conference strict inquiry shall be made into the state of the finances of the charge as follows:

(1.) Let the presiding elder inquire, what amount is necessary

for ministerial support this quarter?

(2.) The secretary shall call the name of each leader in order—stating the amount apportioned to his class per quarter—to which the leader shall respond, stating the amount collected; and if, after calling all the classes, any should be found deficient in the amounts apportioned to them respectively, it shall be the duty of the steward and leaders of those classes to report to them the amount of said deficiency, and immediately adopt the most efficient means to collect the same, and pay it over to the recording steward, or preachers of the charge, as the board of stewards may direct at the quarterly conference, at which the deficiency occurred.

(3.) Let the presiding elder inquire at the same time, if the stewards and leaders have fully carried the plan into operation in

the class.

(4.) Whether there are those in the classes who are able, but refuse, to contribute to the support of the Gospel among them, and the reasons for such refusal.

(5.) Whether the local preachers and exhorters co-operate with

the stewards and leaders in carrying out this plan.

5. At each quarterly meeting the recording steward shall report to the Church, after the reading of the pastor's quarterly report, the state of the finances of the charge for the quarter, stating the amount apportioned to each class, the amount received, and the deficiency, if any.

6. That, to avoid all mistakes in receiving and in crediting collections in the class, it shall be the duty of the leader, once in each quarter at least, to call over the name of each member, stating the amount paid, that if any error exist it may be cor-

rected in the class-book.

- 7. There shall be appointed by the district stewards one lay member from each district to attend the annual conference, who shall, with an equal number of ministers, form a joint committee, to change, revise, or amend these regulations, or to present to the conference any other plan of finance which they may devise. These lay members shall have seats within the bar of the conference, and shall have liberty to speak upon all questions connected with their duties as a committee. This committee shall meet on Friday, at three o'clock, P. M., of the session of the annual conference.
- 8. The preachers of the conference are earnestly requested to see that the stewards and leaders carry this system fully into operation, in each class, within the bounds of their respective charges.

REPORT ON CAMP MEETINGS.

THE Committee on Camp Meetings desire to report in favor of continuing the assembling of Christians in tented groves for prayer and praise. Such sacred associations have been owned of Heaven, and they are an efficient auxiliary to the triumphs of true religion, the successful and rapid spread of the great kingdom of peace in the world. The signs of the times evidence the advance of truth, the conquering power of the cross, and the coming of a better day. Despotism is falling as the true light appreads upon our fallen race.

1. It is with grateful feelings we acknowledge that camp meetings have been crowned, by almighty Goodness, in the salvation of thousands who now sing in heaven, and thousands more are

rejoicing on their way to the kingdom immortal.

Camp meetings need never prove a failure. If properly entered into and managed, they will be a blessing to any commu-

nity.

3. We recommend, with the approval of the conference, that a camp meeting be held in each presiding elder's district, and that the people go out to them only to do good and prepare for the joys of a glorious immortality.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

DEAR BRETHREN,—Your Committee have had the subject of temperance under serious and prayerful consideration, and have come to the painful conclusion that intemperance is on the increase throughout our bounds; and we must say that the way the subject is looked upon and spoken of by many of our preachers and people, is calculated to give it still more power, and to spread still wider its desolation. We often hear it said, "It is only a temperance meeting," "only a temperance lecture," or "it's only a temperance society."

Activity for the spread of temperance principles and labor to save men from a drunkard's hell, are looked upon and spoken of as an extra virtue, or an eccentricity of character, instead of its being a prominent Gospel duty, which every minister and every lover of his race owes to God and men.

It is thought that there are over 45,000 drunkards in Ohio, and more than 135,000 moderate drinkers, that are pressing onward to a place in the ranks of this army of drunkards; and the

efforts of those whose souls are stirred within at the sight of this reeling, disfigured army of immortal souls, marching, with fearful blasphemies, to endless ruin, are spoken of as only the temperance cause. And many of our pulpits sound no alarm, or if any is given it is by an imported lecture. Can it be true that this army of immortal souls are going, with bacchanal songs, to hell, and men that have been for years in the ministry, and have never preached or lectured on the subject of temperance, can feel clear of these souls? We know it is much easier to fight evils and sins that are at a distance, than to grapple with those around us, where we are in danger of feeling the storm, if any is While we, in our conferences, and all other places, show a becoming zeal against the dreadful curse of slavery, do we not treat the equally-dreadful curse of intemperance as though it was a matter of small moment, merely a side issue? Who would think that these men know, or ought to know, that intemperance is shutting in hell every year thousands of souls from our own state? Is it not true of us that we see so much of intemperance, that we are like the southerner, who hears not the groans of the oppressed? Do we, indeed, lay to heart the death of these souls that are falling around us? We hold that the doctrine is clearly set forth in the word of God, that a man is responsible for the known results of his acts. This is clearly set forth in the case of the "ox that is wont to push with his horn," to "guard the roof of the house," and to "cover or fence the pit." Here we are to guard against possible evils, not merely known results. And is the standard of morality lowered under the Gospel dispensation? We read, "For whether we live, we live unto the Lord; and whether we die, we die unto the Lord. Whether we live, therefore, or die, we are the Lord's." Can a man think that he is living for the Lord, and doing his will, who is raising grain to make liquor to make men drunk? Again: "Whatsoever we do is to be done for the glory of God." Can a man that knowingly sells grain to or for a distiller, or a brewer, say he is doing it for the glory of God, when he knows that God's image will be defaced, and that men, through its influence, will be sent disgraced and blaspheming to eternal woe? It is said it was their own free Christ says, "Woe unto him by whom the offense cometh." And can it be denied that the offense comes from the corn and barley-fields of many of our Methodists, that destroy happy families and ruin precious souls, and not merely in one locality, but from all parts of our conference?

There are hundreds of our members that would wash their hands of this sin, if it was properly and perseveringly brought before them; yet how very few of them have had the subject brought before them by the members of our conference! Is it a sin to be a supporter of the traffic as we have been voting every conference of late years? If so, can we be innocent when we meet these men we have not warned at the bar of God? How

much better for them and us to faithfully and perseveringly do our duty! Another growing evil is the recommending by physicians of beer and ale as a medicine. The result of it is that many men, of temperate habits, and that have been for years members of the Church, are becoming drunkards. The idea that the drugged ale and beer of the present day will heal disease, is preposterous; and every man to whom it is recommended should stop and debate, and settle the question, which he thinks the most of, his soul or his body.

It is high time that ministers and laymen, old and young, go to work in earnest to dry up this evil, "doing good of every possible sort, and as far as possible to all men." There is moral power enough in our conference, if it was perseveringly brought to bear on this question, to make the power of Bacchus tremble, and take captive from his ranks thousands every year. Shall we wipe off the reproach of inactivity from our ministry, that we will not only be right in practice, but our voices shall be heard pleading for it in preaching, praying, and lecturing, and in every way help forward the temperance reform? There is not one of us that will be placed in a field where there will not be a call, as loud as the death-wail of a damned soul, for us to work; and if we feel the interest we will have the talents to preach, pray, and lecture against the destroyer; therefore,

1. Resolved, That we look, with unfeigned sorrow, upon the spreading evil of intemperance, and the indifference of thou-

sands in the Church on the subject.

2. Resolved, That we hold it is clearly deducible, from the law of God, that it is wrong to raise or sell the grain, sell the staves, or make the barrels for the purpose of aiding the liquor-trade, or in any way to countenance or help in this work of death.

3. Resolved, That we will renew our efforts to stay the desola-

tions of intemperance in all our fields of labor.

4. Resolved, That we are opposed to mob law to suppress the evils of intemperance, but would rely on moral and lawful means, under the blessing of God, for the accomplishment of the work.

5. Resolved, That every preacher be expected to preach, at least once a year, on the subject of temperance.

REPORT ON BETHEL CAUSE.

Our report is a concise but comprehensive statement of the agent of the Western Seamen's Friends' Society. That is a glorious saying of the Savior, "The field is the world." This field embraces both the land and sea. The wandering and neglected sailor and boatman, far from the hallowed influences of home and the sanctuary, is as truly the subject of our earnest solicitude and prayers as the more highly-favored landsman, in the midst of schools and churches, and the ministry of the word of life, and we should not overlook them in our great mission to the world. In 1829 there were not more than 1,200 seamen in the Church, of all denominations, in this country; now there are supposed to be 25,000. All this has been accomplished by a small clerical force, less than one hundred ministers to a marine population of 500,000. The stations and missions of this Society seem generally prosperous and encouraging; and the Bethel station, in Cincinnati, has been so changed as to renew confidence as it regards future success. In view of the full statements and explanations of the Corresponding Secretary, your Committee present the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That we will give our cordial influence and cooperation in any well-directed efforts for the good of the Bethel

cause.

2. Resolved, That we recommend the appointment of brother Samuel D. Clayton to the Bethel service in Cincinnati.

REPORT

Of the Committee appointed to devise means of assistance for indigent young men called of God to the ministry.

THE committee appointed by the Cincinnati conference, at its last session, to consider the expediency of a plan to assist indigent young men, called of God to the ministry, in procuring an education, met in Wesley Chapel, Dayton, April 13, 1859. Present—Revs. John T. Mitchell, Enoch G. West, and John M. Leavitt. Absent—Dr. Nast and Rev. E. C. Merrick.

On motion, the Rev. John T. Mitchell was elected Chairman, and John M. Leavitt, Secretary. The Revs. M. Marlay, William Herr, and M. P. Gaddis were present, and, by request, took part in the deliberations of the committee. After prayer, by the Rev. M. Marlay, the committee proceeded to business.

Being requested, the Secretary proposed the subject which called the committee together, and suggested a plan to promote

the cause of ministerial education in general in our conference by a system of itinerant teaching, and thus indirectly reach the object intended by the resolution of appointment. After full discussion, it was voted that the Secretary prepare a report of the whole subject, to be submitted to a meeting of the committee to be held during the session of our next conference. After prayer, by the Rev. J. T. Mitchell, the meeting adjourned.

The following is the report submitted to the committee, and by them approved, and recommended for the action of the confer-

ence:

Your committee, appointed to consider the expediency of a plan to assist indigent young men, called of God to the ministry, in

procuring an education, respectfully say:

That they are unanimously of the opinion that nothing can be directly done to secure the object designated in the resolution by which they were appointed. They have come to this conclusion: 1st. Because there is no firm and mature educational interest in our conference to which such a plan could be attached. In the Rock River conference, where a movement has been made in this direction, there is a Biblical school which is a center of action. By its President and professors their scheme of furnishing aid to their indigent young men can be constantly fostered, and a method of assistance is always at hand in their institution. 2d. It appears to your committee that our attention may be more profitably directed to the perfection of our present methods of ministerial education. Upon these all our wisdom and energies may be expended, and when they are properly matured, it will be time to execute a systematic plan in reference to the class of persons named in your resolution. Besides, the object there proposed, they think, will be, indirectly, indeed, but far more certainly and securely attained by a scheme which they have ventured to suggest.

They agree that the necessities of our Church demand the appointment of a teacher for our conference who shall superintend the education of our rising ministry. It is proposed that he meet the different classes four times a year to hear recitations, give instructions and encouragement, and, if necessary, lecture and preach. If there are a few young men among us whom the conference may decide to educate more extensively and thoroughly than is contemplated in our disciplinary course, these could be taken under the roof of the teacher, and be furnished with the requisite facilities, with the understanding that they were to be under the control of the conference, and that they "stir up the gift that is in them," by constantly preaching Christ. In the mean time the teacher could be on the alert to discover those called by the Holy Ghost to the ministry, and furnish them aid

in such a way as the conference may hereafter direct.

The advantages of the plan, in the judgment of the committee,

1. It comports with the genius of our Church. The ordinary theological school does not seem in harmony with the spirit of our system. It too often begets a precision of movement and stateliness of ministerial dignity inconsistent with the more genial freedom of our people and our ministry. On the other hand, between itinerant teaching and itinerant preaching there is an obvi-

ous congruity.

2. It does not change, but execute, our present disciplinary an. The objection to most innovations of the day is that they entirely disregard the wisdom of our fathers. They seek revolution, not reform. They delight in transitions sudden and violent. They forget that under our present system have appeared some of the world's noblest ministers. They have been marked by burning eloquence, extensive learning, fervent piety, unexampled labors. But in former times, when our circuits were extensive, the preacher had the inestimable advantage of frequently repeating the same sermon. He thus attained a precision, an expansiveness, a greatness which nothing else could impart. But the necessity of often appearing before the same congregation, of pastoral visitation, and attention to duties formerly unknown, render it necessary to furnish aids to our ministry not once required. Yet we do not think it advisable to revolutionize, but perfect, our former plans. Except in the case of the few pupils assigned to the roof of the conference teacher, our present disciplinary course would be the one adopted by the law of the Church; and even in regard to these would still be the basis of all their instructions. That this course is not now pursued with sufficient thoroughness and efficiency all confess, and all lament. Nor is this strange. Many of our young men commence the work with but little previous training. They suddenly find themselves involved in all the As first suggested, they solemn responsibilities of a pastorate. must preach, visit, superintend the interests of the Sabbath school and of our periodicals, and labor, perhaps, for months amid all the exciting and exhausting scenes of a revival. They are required, without sufficient sympathy or instruction, to master a course of study which might well tax all their energies. there is a temptation to neglect this, or to impose burdens on mind and body from whose ruinous effects recovery is impossible. When they come to conference for examination, they find two Some say, "They are pious young men. classes of ministers. The seal of God is on their labors, and if he approves them we They have had excellent revivals; we will not be strict in requiring them to comply with the prescribed course." tends to produce a laxity in their mental habits and views of disciplinary obligation, which may be most pernicious to their characters as ministers of Jesus Christ. Others affirm, "We are We dare not neglect its requirements. bound by the Discipline. It is with us a matter of conscience." Thus, on the other hand, our young ministers are too often chilled and discouraged by unreasonable requirements. They vibrate tremblingly between these extremes of their elder brethren—fearing too much severity, but injured by too much charity. How they would value the visits of the authorized teacher who should take them by the hand, remove obstructions from their path, pour kind sympathies into their hearts, and valuable instructions into their minds! They would hail him as an angel from God. Their faces would brighten and their pulses bound to grasp his hand and hear his voice. Now they toil, often hopeless and helpless, through the multiplied embarrassments of the year, expecting at the dreaded examination to find the critical judge. Then they would feel, through all their weary months of toil and labor, the encouragement and assistance of a trusted friend.

3. It meets the whole want of the Church. The ordinary theological school can not reach the masses of our ministry. It would overlook our preachers toiling through so many difficulties on their circuits and in their stations. To them it could extend directly no helping hand. Such, indeed, is the demand for preachers in our Church that it is not now possible, and perhaps will never be possible, even if desirable, to press them all through the mold of a theological seminary. In the institutions which exist, commendable as they are in many respects, your committee fear this fact has been too much disregarded. They do not seem to stoop to the actual necessities of the Church. They are too much isolated from our people and our preachers. But this system of itinerant training accommodates itself to the state of things just as it is, and seeks wisely and gradually to elevate and ennoble our ministry by a method in perfect harmony with the genius of our history, our doctrines, our organization. It also remembers there are a few in every conference who burn for a more extensive erudition. It is their desire by day, and their dream by night. It is a flame kindled by the breath of God. No Church can lightly treat such aspirations. To do this would extinguish the light of the noblest faculties, and narrow the circle of the most extensive capacities for usefulness. As God needed a Paul among the apostles, a Luther among the reformers, a Wesley among the Methodists, he now requires a certain proportion of talent brightened by all that education can bestow. Certainly we are blind to our interests if we neglect this great truth. Now, our plan proposes to meet this want by empowering the conference to assign to the home of the teacher such young men as it may select to be thoroughly trained in the Hebrew, Greek, and Latin Scriptures, and such branches of theology as may hereafter be designated.

4. It fixes the responsibility of our educational plans. What an anomaly our Church presents! Consider the hundreds of young men in our ministry! How many glowing hearts; how many vigorous intellects! They enter our ranks from the plow, the shop, the store, the office. Many have their habits of study and their whole mental character to form. They have in view a voca-

tion involving consequences boundless as the circle of eternity. Who in all the bounds of our Zion has the responsibility of their training? Can you fix it on any man? Can you attach it to any office? Many of our presiding elders are noble men, ornaments to our Church. But they do not claim the gift of professional instructors. They feel called not to teach, but to preach. same may be said of our senior pastors. They exercise but a slight supervision of the studies of our ministers. How astonishing that a work so vast, so difficult, so momentous, so far-reaching in its consequences, should have no responsible agent, no guiding hand, no controlling head!

5. It secures uniformity. Now, our young men pursue their studies at the time, in the way, and in some parts of our work, almost to the extent they choose. How wise to have some superintending mind to which all can look for counsel, and which can reduce whatever pertains to the cultivation of our ministry to an exact system, and leave on it the impress of uniformity!

6. It will enable us to secure the co-operation of our presiding elders and senior pastors. There are parts of the work which these are prevented from superintending from want of time, or inclination, or preparation, and therefore the temptation is great to neglect all. They, indeed, accomplish all that could be expected under the circumstances. This, however, is little. if a teacher were employed to take on him the drill and the drudgery from which other men excusably shrink, our other brethren could be assigned spheres of labor in which they could move with pleasure and profit. Urged forward by the stated teacher, and relieved of all the tedium of details, they could press our young men to diligence, give general directions, and assist in their examinations.

7. It places the conference teacher in sympathy with preachers and people, instead of tending to isolation and estrangement. Some of us know by experience that the effect of a teacher's pursuits is to make him overestimate intellectual advantages, and remove him from the feelings of ordinary life. Unless he has an unusual share of manhood or of grace, should he attain the brilliance, he also contracts the coldness of the iceberg. In the habit of associating with minds aspiring to high culture, he is tempted to undervalue ordinary attainments. Native nobility of character, large measures of the Holy Spirit, check these tendencies, or even turn them to advantage. But in too many systems of training they have even been fostered and developed. Extreme precision, stiff dignity, repulsive exclusiveness, thus attach to professor and pupil. For this reason the glow and warmth of the people have, in frequent instances, been chilled and quenched. Now how different with our conference teacher! He is an itinerant. Here is a living bond of connection between him and his brethren. hold him start upon the discharge of his arduous weekly duties! He meets the young ministers with the warm gush of friendship.

His heart glows with affection, his lips drop words of instruction. He draws the senior pastors and presiding elders around him for counsel, and enlists their valuable assistance. He is called to preach. He rises to proclaim a free and full salvation through faith in the blood of Jesus, attested by the Holy Ghost, to be exhibited in the life, to be testified by the mouth. He returns to his classes at home, not a shriveled intellectual mummy, but a true living man, with healthy flesh and warm blood, and a pulsating heart and an invigorated head. He is a man of the preachers. He is a man of the people. He is a man of the Church. In him center all her noblest interests. He is a link between young and old, the laity and the ministry. Where on earth is there a position for such exalted development and extensive usefulness?

8. It retains the cotemporaneous cultivation of natural and gracious gifts. Theological schools have too often severed what God has joined, have divorced what Divine wisdom has married, have torn forever asunder what should have been forever united. They have inclined to develop the endowments of nature, and not sufficiently cultivate the endowments of grace. They have confined their pupils to the college, and secluded them from men. They have taught them the letter, and not filled them with the Spirit. Their pupils have gained knowledge, but lost the love of Christ. They have become attached to books, but not to souls. have been led to trust more in the feeble arm of flesh than in the omnipotence of the Holy Ghost. Now always in our Zion, if we have not sedulously, as we should, fostered the natural, we have certainly encouraged the gracious gifts of our ministry. If they have been deficient, in some instances, in the grammar, and logic, and elocution of man, they have surpassed in the grammar, and logic, and elocution of the Holy Ghost. This has been the secret of our power and of our success. Now our plan leaves the masses of our ministry, during their training, just where they are—on their circuits and in their stations. Thus they have the same opportunities as ever of a gracious education. All these gifts, as formerly, are exercised in the practical work of saving souls. But it proposes to increase their opportunities of improving the gifts of nature. And as regards the few assigned to the roof of the conference teacher, it would send them out, not only on the Sabbaths, but during the week, to the lanes, the alleys, the jails of the city, and into the vacant churches and destitute regions of the country, to distribute tracts, to exhort, to pray, to preach. Thus, the head and the heart, grace and nature, are educated constantly together, and pushed to their farthest and most practical development.

Your committee think, that if this method of instruction was adopted as a foundation, it would be easy to erect upon it a scheme of assistance for our indigent young men; but that without the first, or something similar, as a basis, the latter will be a tottering

and unsubstantial fabric.

They would also say, that, owing to its central position, and facilities for traveling, the Cincinnati conference presents unusual advantages for the plan here suggested. If it succeeds here, it will spread from us as a center, and become the law of our whole vast connection from ocean to ocean.

The only objections which have been urged against this scheme is the difficulty in securing means and of obtaining a suitable teacher. We wish no debt incurred. Let the plan slumber till the money is obtained. If God smile and direct, in answer to strong faith, and fervent prayer, and wise effort, he will give us both the endowment and the instructor. In him is all our trust for counsel, and to him shall be all the glory of success.

Your committee would also recommend immediate action, and suggest that Rev. John M. Leavitt be appointed agent to solicit funds, in connection with his pastoral office, it being understood

that his services are gratuitous.

MEMOIR OF REV. PERLEE B. WILBER.

THE REV. PERLEE B. WILBER, President of the Wesleyan Female College of Cincinnati, died at his residence, on Saturday morning, June 11, 1859, at a quarter past two o'clock.

He was born Dec. 21, 1806, in Duchess county, state of New York. At the age of seven he went to reside with an uncle, with whom he remained and labored for many years upon a farm. After he became of age he continued his manual labor, and by industry and economy he succeeded in accumulating sufficient means to enable him to obtain a collegiate education. With this noble purpose he entered Cazenovia Seminary; and while prosecuting his studies in this institution, he was born by a new, celestial birth, and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church. As a student he was noted for his intense application, and, as a legitimate result, for the very rapid advancement he made in his studies. At this early period, too, he developed those traits of high-toned and conscientious moral integrity which continued to

be a crowning feature of his character through all his subsequent

Having completed his preparatory course, he entered the Wesleyan University at Middletown, Conn. This institution had just been organized under the Presidency of that accomplished scholar and successful educator, Dr. Fisk. In 1884 he graduated, with high honor, to the degree of A. B. Three years subsequently he received the degree of A. M. from the same institution, and delivered the Master's oration. It appears to have been his early conviction that he was called, by the providence of God, to labor especially in the educational department of the Church. To this end he directed his thoughts and efforts. Immediately after leaving college he was employed in an academy at White Plains, then under the patronage of the New York conference. But before the close of the first year he was elected Professor of Ancient Languages in the institution where he had pursued his preparatory studies, and in a short time thereafter, Professor of the Natural Sciences.

In 1838 he was elected to the Presidency of Buckingham Female College, in Virginia. Although just at this juncture the principalship of Cazenovia Seminary, where he had first entered his academical course, and where he had been engaged as a teacher, and where, too, he had gathered around him many warm friends, and had formed many pleasant associations, was tendered him, yet, without one moment's hesitation, he turned his back upon familiar scenes and cherished friends, and, with his then youthful wife—who has ever nobly shared his toils and responsibilities, and aided in his work—he went forth to his new and untried field of labor. During his first year at Buckingham College he was elected, on the special recommendation of Dr. Fisk, to the Presidency of Washington College, Mississippi. And, although this position was offered him with high and flattering pecuniary prospects, he declined acceptance, upon the simple ground of implied or inferred obligation to the trustees of Buckingham. Here he labored faithfully and successfully for nearly five years. In 1842 he was elected President of the Wesleyan Female College in Cincinnati; and on the first day of September, of the same year, he opened the school, and laid the foundation of that noble institution that has been a blessing to many. For seventeen years of untold anxiety he toiled, late and early, with a devotion untiring and self-consuming, denying himself both healthful recreation and necessary repose, that he might accomplish the purpose to which he had consecrated his life, namely, that of building up an institution in Cincinnati second to none in the Union, and that he might train woman for life's real duties and arduous responsibilities.

Under his ever-vigilant eye, unyielding purpose, and uncompromising integrity, the institution has grown, from a mere handful of scholars in a private room, to be one of the largest in the land, enjoying a patronage almost unparalleled, and embracing a course

of study extensive enough to satisfy the largest wants, and at the same time thoroughly systematized and arranged. Indeed, the whole history of the institution under brother Wilber's charge, for the period of seventeen years, has been one of progressive development and unexampled success. And it is not too much to say, that for this success and high distinction the institution is mainly indebted to the wise management and untiring efforts of him whose loss we deeply feel. Brother Wilber, as a teacher of young ladies, occupied a foremost rank. He was a most rigid disciplinarian, so much so that he was often thought severe; but a clear analysis of his principles showed that his actions were governed by a fine sense of what he conceived to be right; his chief endeavor in their education was, to make them as well acquainted with life as possible, before they were called upon to cross its threshold into the real and active world. He was a man of great inflexibility and determination, one of his most distinguished characteristics being, to do right, lead him wherever it might; and a more fitting monument to his memory could not be raised than that success which has attended all his efforts in the field of female education.

He was a member first of the Ohio and then of the Cincinnati conference, from the time he identified himself with the west. It is but just to say, that while he was recognized as a minister of standing and worth in the Church, he ranked much higher as an educator.

The children of his careful training and instruction are found in every state in the Union. Many of them are found in the highest and most responsible positions of life. Some are missionaries in Asia, in Africa, in South America, and in the islands of the sea. With the solicitude and sympathy of a father he watched over those whose education was intrusted to his care; and many times he displayed a most noble generosity in aiding, with his own private means, those who would otherwise have been compelled to abandon their studies. It was a remark he often made, that "though he could not be one of the lights in the world himself, yet he could point to many whom he had aided in preparing to be lights in society and in the Church."

Nor did his deep solicitude for the welfare of his pupils cease when they left his immediate charge, but continued to be manifested for them in all their subsequent career; and he expressed it as an occasion of gratitude to God, that all the graduates in Virginia, and of the Wesleyan Female College, and all who had been long under his instruction, were, so far as he knew, good and true women.

The death of our departed brother was sudden and unexpected. A slight indisposition, from which no danger was apprehended, suddenly terminated in congestion of the brain; which, in the brief space of about thirty hours, had completed its work. His physical system, having been shaken by his arduous labors,

sank beneath the violent attack, with no power to rally; and the strong man fell into the slumber of death. It is to be much regretted that, in consequence of the peculiar nature of his disease, he was not permitted to give verbal testimony of the triumph of his faith in the last conflict. It was one of the deep afflictions of that dark hour, that he could give no responsive utterance to the affectionate anxiety that waited around his last moments, nor tell of divine support and immortal hope.

But no depth of despairing agony could for one moment doubt the purity and dying affection of his heart, the fixedness and as-

surance of his faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

And his life—better than all utterances of speech—was a living and daily witness of the truth and power of the religion of the blessed Savior.

On Tuesday, the 7th of June, he attended to his usual duties in the school, speaking kindly to the pupils and encouragingly to the teachers. About three o'clock in the afternoon he left the school-room to attend to some outdoor business, which occupied his attention till about eight o'clock. After attending to some office duties, he retired at a late hour. A severe headache kept him in bed later than usual on Wednesday morning. He was prevailed upon to remain in his room that day "and use some simple remedies."

On Thursday morning he was much worse. Early on that morning he fell into a deep sleep, from which, about noon, he had but a momentary startling; only, however, to relapse into a profounder slumber, from which he never aroused. One who stood at his bedside says, "At two and a quarter o'clock, Saturday morning, the angel of death came. The labored breathing grew shorter and fainter—shorter and gentler still—no struggle—no groan. Then all was quiet, and as we stood around the bed, we knew that the angels were opening wide the portals of the land of rest, and the weary toiler of earth, now the crowned victor of heaven, was, with exceeding joy, entering in."

"Serene, serene,
He pressed the crumbling verge of this terrestrial scene,
Breathed soft in child-like trust
The patient groan,
Gave back to dust its dust,
To heaven its own."

MEMOIR OF REV. H. S. SELLMAN.

REV. HORACE S. SELLMAN was born in Brown county, Ohio, January 14, 1821, where he was converted to God and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, at a camp meeting held, in 1844,

by Rev. M. Marlay. He served the Church in the capacities of class-leader and exhorter for some time before entering the ministry, which he did after a deep and solemn conviction that he was inwardly moved by the Holy Ghost to preach Christ and him crucified to fallen man.

He entered the Ohio annual conference in 1846, and successfully labored in the following fields, namely: Georgetown, Milford, Fletcher, Worthington, Lewisburg, Monroe, Germantown, New Paris, Mechanicsburg, and Fairfield. Here, about the middle of his second year, he fell at his post in glorious triumph, about nine o'clock on the evening of February 1, 1859. His disease was hemorrhage of the lungs, of which he had several attacks during

the previous year.

He preached his last sermon some two or three weeks before his death; then came home to die. Throughout his late illness he was never heard to complain, but was always happy. His physician remarked that he had never seen such excruciating suffering borne with such meekness. To Rev. J. C. Deem he said: "Tell my brethren at conference that I fell at my post, a sinner saved by grace." His presiding elder, Rev. William Simmons, a few hours before his death said to him, "Brother Sellman, do you feel that the Gospel which you have preached to others comforts and sustains you now?" He responded, "O, yes, O, yes, all is right, all is well;" and, with heaven shining in his face, and glory filling his soul, he added, "I must, I must suppress my emotion, as it may cost me my life in a few minutes; for the doctor knows that another turn of bleeding would cause sudden death." Before leaving his room brother Simmons asked, "Have you any thing to say to me especially?" He answered, "If I die I want you to preach my funeral sermon. That is all I have to say." In a happy frame of mind that evening he fell sweetly asleep in the arms of Jesus, and while we labor in the cause of Christ on earth he doubtless enjoys the presence of Christ in heaven. leaves a widow and three fatherless children, for whom we ask the sympathies and prayers of his brethren, and would also commend them to their liberality. Brother Simmons complied with his request-addressing a crowded, serious, and weeping congregation, from 2 Timothy iv, 6-8.

Brother Sellman was a good Gospel minister, and generally

esteemed where he resided.

"O may we triumph so
When all our warfare 's past,
And, dying, find our latest foe
Under our feet at last!"



Swormstedt, late Book Agent of the Methodist Episcopal Church, in Cincinnati; and we deeply sympathize with him in his personal afflictions, and hope that he will yet be able to render service in the regular work in our conference.

On Baptism.

Whereas, there is some diversity of opinion and practice on

the propriety of rebaptizing; therefore,

Resolved, That it is the sense of this conference that no member of this conference should in any case administer the ordinance of baptism to a candidate whom the administrator knows to have received baptism in any way, or at any time, recognized as valid by our Church.

Conference Teacher.

1. Resolved, That Rev. J. M. Leavitt be continued in his agency for the endowment of a conference teacher for the instruction of the junior preachers of the Cincinnati conference, with the understanding that it be gratuitous and do not interfere with his regular work.

2. Resolved, That brother Leavitt be authorized to receive proposals for the location of a residence for said teacher; provided, that he make no contract for the same till such proposals receive

the approval of this conference.

Preachers not to Interfere with each other's Charges.

Resolved, That in the judgment of the Cincinnati conference it is highly improper for a preacher to interfere with the administration of discipline or pastoral work of a preacher of another charge, unless his counsel or aid be called for by such preacher, or it become his duty to complain of him to the presiding elder.

Day of Fasting and Prayer.

Resolved, That the first Friday of January, 1861, be observed as a day of fasting, humiliation, and prayer in all our Churches for the prosperity of the work of God.

Indebtedness of Springfield Female College.

Resolved, That J. T. Mitchell, J. F. Chalfant, and George W. Harris be a committee to represent this conference in the Board of Trustees of the College the ensuing year, and that they be empowered in connection with the Board to take any practicable measures, by subscription or loan, to relieve the Springfield Female College and High School of its financial embarrassments.

Administration of Discipline.

Resolved, That a thorough knowledge of our excellent book of Discipline, and a conscientious observance of our ordination vows, to "keep our rules for conscience' sake," will correct all defects, secure uniformity in administration and usage, and promote in every respect the prosperity of the Church.

LAW QUESTIONS.

To the President of the Cincinnati Conference:

1. Does the responsibility of a preacher on trial to the quarterly conference of the charge where he labors, justify the presiding elder in asking the following question?

Is it the judgment of this conference that brother -

make a useful and acceptable traveling preacher?

2. Does this responsibility include the examination of the moral character and the renewal of the preacher's license?

Answer. 1. I see no violation of law or propriety in ascertaining the opinion of members of the quarterly conference by asking such a question. But the question is not properly quarterly conference business, and should not be a matter of record.

2. The probationer being a local preacher, is amenable to the quarterly conference for his moral character, and his license is

subject to renewal.

When a person is expelled from the Church for immorality, is his mere application for reception on trial in the Church sufficient evidence of penitence, and confession, and satisfactory reformation?

Answer. The Chair is not authorized to determine how confession, contrition, and satisfactory reformation shall be mani-The words should be applied in their ordinary acceptation. If an administrator depart from this, he is responsible to his annual conference.

In answer to an inquiry, Bishop Simpson decided that the Church can entertain charges against any of its members, if presented by a member.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

THE Committee on Education would respectfully report as follows:

Ohio Wesleyan University.

This noble University deservedly stands at the head of our literary institutions, and not only maintains its former high reputation, but is increasing in efficiency and securing more largely the public favor and patronage. In high moral character, the ability and energy of the Faculty, and the facilities furnished generally for acquiring a thorough education, it is unsurpassed by any similar institution in the land.

While rejoicing in the increasing prosperity of the University, we can not but deplore the great loss it has sustained in the removal to other posts of duty of its late talented, accomplished, and devoted officers, Rev. Edward Thomson, D. D., President, and Rev. William L. Harris, Professor of Natural Science. We, however, congratulate the numerous friends of the University that these vacancies have been most happily filled by the appointment of gentlemen of eminent ability and long experience as educators. And hence we think we are warranted in indulging the hope that the future will be as prosperous as the past has been eminently successful.

We herewith submit a statement of the financial condition of the University:

For raising one hundred thousand of this, the Board suggest that each of the patronizing conferences raise within four years an amount equal to one dollar per member; and as commemorative of the introduction of Methodism into America, that it be called the *Centenary Contribution*. The names of all paying one dollar, or over, to be recorded in a well-bound volume, to be deposited in the University Library, and labeled, *Subscribers to the Centenary Contribution*.

The first fifty thousand dollars to be devoted to the erection of buildings, etc., the main building to be called *Centenary Hall*. Any person subscribing one thousand dollars, or more, to have his name inscribed upon a tablet, to be placed in the vestibule of the Hall

The next fifty thousand dollars collected to be denominated the Centenary Fund. This to be permanently invested by the Trustees, and to entitle the sons of the traveling preachers of the patronizing conferences to tuition in the college classes free of charge.

For raising the other fifty thousand dollars, the Trustees make no suggestion, only that the attention of our men of wealth be called to the subject.

The following resolutions are submitted in relation to the above

1. Resolved, That we approve of the plan suggested by the Board of Trustees and Visitors for raising money for increasing the permanent fund of the University, erecting a new chapel, and for other necessary improvements; and that we will cooperate in

hearty effort to carry it into execution, it being understood that there is no moral obligation incurred beyond the making of an earnest and hearty effort to raise the amount.

2. Resolved, That each preacher in charge is hereby directed to use a suitable subscription-book, to be furnished by the University, and to allow each subscriber to insert his or her own name, with the amount subscribed; and that when the subscriptions are paid, the books be deposited in the archives of the University.

3. Resolved, That, as an expression of gratitude to a kind Providence for the abundant temporal blessings with which the year has been crowned, we will, as far as practicable, open the subscriptions on Thanksgiving Day of this year.

In concluding our report on the Ohio Wesleyan University, we

recommend for adoption the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Bishop be requested to appoint Rev. L. D. M'Cabe to the chair of Moral Science and Biblical Literature in this institution.

Resolved, That brothers C. W. Sears and A. Meharry be appointed a Visiting and Examining Committee to the University.

Wilberforce University.

This institution is the offspring of philanthropy. In surveying the condition of the colored population of our country, no one could fail to see their degradation, both of intellect and heart; and no Christian could fail to ask, what can be done to enlighten and save? This inquiry, prompted by piety and benevolence, gradually unfolded itself in the plan and establishment of Wilberforce University. The design of this enterprise is the education of the free people of color in our country; nor should it ever be diverted from this noble purpose. We have reason to believe that the institution is fulfilling, to a good degree, its benevolent mission.

The report of the Visitors shows that the examinations were very satisfactory, and the exercises of the Commencement inter-

esting to the audience and creditable to the pupils.

President Rust has proven himself fully equal to the difficult position in which he has been placed, and has in all respects more than met our expectation; while the able corps of teachers, with whom he has been associated, have acquitted themselves in a manner to reflect honor upon the institution. Such has been the vigilance, and such the powers of government, exerted by the President and Faculty, that the school has been especially marked by good order and propriety of deportment.

Rev. Uriah Heath, the Agent, has been untiring and successful

in his efforts to promote the interests of the institution.

Of the financial condition of the University, we have not a full exhibit; but gather from a verbal statement of the Agent the following facts:

We deem it important to state the true condition of the Claffin donation. Mr. Claffin never promised certainly more than \$7,500, but promised conditionally \$2,500, and even intimated that he would do more. Of this \$7,500, \$2,000 are in Sonora bonds, the real value of which we have no means of knowing. Mr. Claffin has never, at any time, indicated to what specific objects he designed this donation to be applied.

We close our report on this institution by recommending the

following resolutions:

Resolved, That the presiding Bishop be requested to appoint Rev. R. S. Rust President of Wilberforce University for the ensuing year.

Resolved, That Revs. M. Smith and J. C. Bontecou be a Visit-

ing and Examining Committee to the University.

Resolved, That we highly appreciate the labors of Rev. Uriah Heath as Agent of Wilberforce University, and respectfully request the Ohio conference to recommend his continuance in the agency the ensuing year.

Wesleyan Female College.

As this institution is well known, and nothing peculiar in its condition and history has transpired during the past year, our

report will be brief.

We are happy to state that the new President, Rev. Robt. Allyn, has met the responsibilities of his trying situation with marked ability and success. The number of pupils in attendance has been quite as large as in any former year, and the graduating class was the largest that has ever gone forth from the institution. The course of instruction has been improved, and the standard elevated. Its financial condition is also improving, and there is a prospect of liquidating, during the coming year, about \$5,000 of its indebtedness. The Joint Committee of Visitation and Examination, appointed by the conference and the Trustees, represented the examinations to be very satisfactory and highly creditable to both the faculty and the pupils.

We recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That the Bishop be requested to appoint Rev. Robt.

Allyn President of the Wesleyan Female College.

2. Resolved, That the presiding elders of East and West Cincinnati districts, and the pastors of Wesley and Morris Chapels, be a Visiting and Examining Committee to the institution for the ensuing year.

Hillsboro Female College.

We are gratified in being able to report the institution in a prosperous condition. The last examination and Commencement exercises were of a highly-interesting character, and attracted large and delighted audiences. The graduating class was large, and their literary exercises highly creditable to them and the

College.

Dr. Mathews, the able and experienced President, shows increasing energy in promoting the prosperity of the institution. The Board of Instruction is an accomplished and efficient one. The college building, for beauty of location, commodiousness, and neatness of finish, is unsurpassed by any in the west. The indebtedness, which a year ago hung so portentously over this institution, has been provided for, so as to give present relief, and insure ultimately its entire liquidation.

Having received no communication from the Trustees of this

institution, we submit the following resolution:

Resolved, That the present Board of Trustees be reappointed

for the ensuing year.

We recommend, also, the adoption of these additional resolu-

Resolved, That the Bishop be requested to appoint Rev. Joseph M'D. Mathews, D. D., President of the institution for the ensuing

Resolved, That the presiding elder of Hillsboro district, and stationed preacher of Hillsboro, be a Visiting and Examining

Committee for the ensuing year.

Springfield Female College.

We have had under consideration the report of the Trustees of the Springfield Female College and High School, in which the indebtedness is set forth, as well as suggestions as to its future disposition. The debt is now \$3,500, bearing high interest, with no means of liquidation provided. It is proposed to make over the institution to the Trustees of the Ohio Wesleyan University as a Preparatory School. Were the institution free from debt, this might be the beginning of a grand plan of consolidation, by which all our seminaries could become the property of the University, and

ultimately relieve it from the burden of a preparatory department. But in the absence of any expressed wish of the Trustees of the University on this subject, and in view of the fact that the tenure of the scholarship plan will require the University for many years to come to give preparatory instruction, and especially in view of the present and prospective pecuniary liabilities of the University, we do not feel prepared to recommend the transfer of Springfield Female College with its present pressing debt.

But something must be done. It is now in legal jeopardy.

The conference has important interests to look after and protect. In the absence of any other suggestions of the Trustees as to its disposal, we do not feel prepared to recommend any specific course, but hope some member of the conference may, by resolution, give

the matter a satisfactory direction.

Rev. Dr. Weakley having resigned the Presidency of the College, it has passed for the present into the hands of Prof. E. G. Dial, an educator of experience and competency, who will no doubt carry out the objects contemplated in its charter. we cheerfully recommend the school to the patronage of our people, hoping it may yet, under his able management, not only be freed from debt, but long continue as an instrument of usefulness.

Baldwin University.

It will be remembered that some two years since the Cincinnati conference recommended the establishment of a German professorship in the Baldwin University, located at Berea, Ohio. are happy to inform the conference that the efforts of our German brethren of the Cincinnati, the North Ohio, and the South-Eastern Indiana conferences, to endow this professorship, have, since the appointment of Rev. J. Rothweiler, been prosecuted with zeal and The property of the German department, estimated at the lowest figure, is worth in the endowment fund \$7,000, and in real estate \$5,000; by many the latter item is valued at \$10,000. The German Hall, a large stone building, donated by the generous patron of the institution, father Baldwin, was repaired during the fast vacation, at an expense of about \$400, part of which is

expected to be paid by the rent of rooms; and for the other part, brother Rothweiler looks to the contributions of the patronising conferences. We hope he will not be disappointed in his generous trust. This is the first call that ever Berea has made for help, for which there was not offered an ample equivalent. Our brethren in the west have given us a noble example in the contributions they obtained from their people for their institution at Quincy. Let us emulate their zeal and liberality.

We respectfully submit the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That we recommend the German department of the Baldwin University to the cordial support of the German members of the Methodist Episcopal Church in this and the ad-

joining conferences.

2. Resolved, That we earnestly call upon the members of this conference, and the membership in their fields of labor, who have given notes in favor of this institution, to pay the installments due thereon; and that the preachers actively cooperate in the collection thereof, and of the remainder of the endowment

8. Resolved, That the stationed preacher at Columbus be appointed a Visitor and Examiner to the German department of the University, during the ensuing year.

4. Resolved, That the German pastors of the Cincinnati conference are advised to preach, wherever it is practicable, once during this year, a sermon on education, and to take up a collection to pay the expenses incurred in the fitting up of the German Hall, and also to create a contingent fund for the payment of the expenses of the Visiting and Examining Committees.

Xenia Female College.

Your Committee take great pleasure in reporting this institution in a flourishing condition. The foreign patronage is largely increasing, while the local patronage is as good as could reasonably be expected in Xenia, where the common school system exists in such perfection.

The school was visited last winter with a most gracious revival of religion, in which nearly all the unconverted boarders were

brought to the knowledge of salvation.

The President of the institution, Prof. Smith, is an educator of marked ability and untiring industry; while Mrs. Smith is eminently qualified for her position, and is a model for young ladies in the formation of their habits and character. We are assured that parents who send their daughters to the Xenia Female College, may feel confident that they will be as safe and well cared for as they can be away from home.

The Agent, Rev. William Simmons, by whose indomitable energy and perseverance the debts of the institution have this year been reduced about \$1,250, reports the entire indebtedness, including interest and the expense of making collections, as \$1,500; to meet which there is a reliable subscription of \$1,000, leaving but \$500 to be provided for, which it is thought can readily be done in these prosperous times; and thus the cheering spectacle be presented to us of at least one literary institution entirely free We submit the following resolutions: from debt.

1. Resolved, That the increasing prosperity of the Xenia Female College is a source of joy and gratitude to this conference, and we cheerfully recommend it to the patronage of the Church

and the community.

2. Resolved, That Rev. R. S. Rust and the pastor of Xenia station be a Committee of Visitation and Examination to the institution for the ensuing year.

Linden Hill Academy.

This institution is located in New Carlisle, Clark county, Ohio. The Cincinnati conference, at its last session, agreed to receive this Academy under its control and patronage, on certain conditions, which we are happy to state have been substantially fulfilled. The Trustees represent the property as entirely free from debt, and propose to convey it by deed to the conference so soon as this body shall appoint and authorize proper persons to receive it. We therefore recommend for adoption the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That the Cincinnati conference receive Linden

Hill Academy under its control and patronage.
2. Resolved, That Rev. David Reed and Rev. J. Braden be authorized to act as a committee to secure the legal conveyance of the property to the Cincinnati conference, and to complete all the arrangements for its reception.

3. Resolved, That Rev. David Reed, Rev. Samuel Brown, John Johnston, Isaac Meranda, Samuel W. Starrett, and William A. Lamb be appointed Trustees of the institution in behalf of the

conference.

4. Resolved, That the Bishop be requested to appoint Rev.

John Braden as Principal of Linden Hill Academy.

5. Resolved, That the preachers in charge of New Carlisle and Addison circuits and Fairfield station be a Visiting and Examining Committee to the institution for the ensuing year.

BETHEL REPORT.

THE duty assigned your Committee has been rather pleasant this year. It has led them to take a bird's-eye view of the work of the American Seamen's Friend Society, which has been scattering its blessings profusely on both slopes of our continent, and extending its successful operations to distant and foreign parts. They are about adopting a new feature in their plan, that is, of using their influence to distribute pious and zealous seamen among the outward-bound shipping, so as to furnish every crew with one or more professors of religion with a small but select library. They have already made the experiment on a small scale, and found it in every instance to be successful. One case out of many we will state. A young man, in whose hands a library was placed, by his modest deportment and earnestness, has been the means of leading not less than twelve other seamen to Christ. A lady passenger describes the sea devotions thus:

"The forecastle was fixed up tidily. Every thing seemed in place. One lamp was fastened to a beam, and sent its imperfect light around on those who were to take the charge. The service was begun by reading the Psalm, 'O come, let us sing unto the Lord: let us make a joyful noise unto the rock of our salvation.' Never shall I forget when, after singing

'I am going home to die no more,'

one of them kneeled in prayer, and in a humble petition committed us to Him who heareth the contrite and showeth mercy. He prayed for the dear friends who were remembering us, out on the sea; and the thoughts of you, as you gather around the family altar, came sweetly to mind; and more sweetly came the thought of a cloud of incense ascending from sea and land, and mingling before the mercy-seat. Not a sound from without was heard as he rose. The soft evening mist inwrapped us as in a vail, but

'More softly than the dew is shed, Or cloud is floated overhead,'

fell the dews of the Holy Spirit and his influence in the forecastle. The sailor then read the third chapter of John, and, in a simple, solemn manner, pushed home the truth. My friends thought only of improving my health in sending me to sea; but God's ways are not as our ways; he designed to quicken me into spiritual life by a poor sailor exhorting in the fore-peak."

This plan can not fail. It is cornering poor Jack in his soberest moments, where he can neither fight nor fly—where God applies his truth by sweeping tempests, forked lightning, and terrific peals

of bursting thunder.

The Society received during the last year about \$40,700.

The Western Seamen's Friend Society has been operating with

equal zeal, but in a more limited sphere, at an expense of \$14,000. Its operations have been principally on our inland seas and great western waters. That part of its work with which we are more especially concerned, as lying within the bounds of our conference—the Cincinnati Bethel—is in a more prosperous condition than it has ever been, as will be seen by an extract of the report of the chaplain:

"Our Sabbath school constitutes an important feature of our I may say-I think without the least exaggeration-that we have the largest Sabbath school in the state of Ohio, without a single exception, and the largest, by all odds, if we take into consideration the class of children embraced in our school. part of the city in which our Bethel is located is almost entirely without the pale of religious influence, and here the river-men have their homes. We have gone out to these homes in the streets and alleys, in the cellars and garrets, and from them we have gathered the scores and hundreds that throng our school.

"Little is known in this great city of the great sufferings of the poor during the long winter months, when business is dull, and the expenses of living increased. In our visitations to the poor and friendless, we have been surprised and pained to find so much suffering and want. One mother told me she had kept herself and four children on dry bread for a whole week, and only thirty-seven and a half cents' worth of it at that. We took her children to our school and clothed them. I found on Front-street, in the back part of an Irish whisky shop, a little girl, six years of age, nestled down under a stair-way, with a pig and two dogs, trying to keep warm. We took her and her sister to our school, and clothed them, and now they are in comfortable situations.

"Another woman, the wife of a steamboat captain, who had abandoned her, we found living in a room so small that she could not lay her straw bed on the floor of it, but had to take it out and lay it in the hall and sleep there. She is a Christian mother, trying to raise her family in the fear of the Lord. In the midst of her deep poverty she has a faith in God that is unshaken. On my last visit, as I was going up the rickety stairs, I heard her singing. As I stopped I caught the words of her song:

 Courage my soul, on God rely, Deliverance soon will come;
 A thousand ways has Providence To bring believers home. Courage my soul, thy bitter cross, In every trial here, Shall bear thee to thy heaven above, But shall not enter there.'

Her children were clothed, and found friends and a home in our school.

"We have distributed to the poor of our children, through the past winter, more than two thousand different articles of clothing.

Thus, you see, the Gospel we preach to the poor is not in word only, but in the demonstration of deeds of mercy and charity."

We recommend the following to our conference:

Resolved, That the Bishop be requested to appoint brother Samuel D. Clayton to the Bethel work in Cincinnati.

REPORT ON ITINERANCY AND THE PASTORAL OFFICE.

THE Committee appointed to consider and report upon Itinerancy and the Pastoral Office, present the following as their

report:

Your Committee feel that to do justice to subjects of so grave importance, requires more time and consideration than can well be bestowed upon them amid the hurry and bustle of the business of an annual conference. The itinerancy and pastoral work in our Church are so vital a part of our economy, that they need to be supervised with more than ordinary care.

Our itinerancy was originally intended to be a system of mutual sacrifices between the ministry and membership of the Church, the ministers agreeing to waive their right to select their fields of labor, and the membership their right to choose their pastors, and the power to fix the pastoral relation between them was committed to a third party—the superintendents of the

Church.

This concession of right was deemed necessary to perpetuate our work of preaching the Gospel in the itinerant form, and the success that has crowned our labors fully demonstrates the wisdom and efficiency of this part of our economy. And we would fain hope that the day is far distant when this feature of our ecclesiastical polity shall be abandoned. And yet the fact is patent to the most casual observer, that our practice has materially modified this feature of our economy, and that there is a constant tendency to still further modifications; and modifications, too, which, if permitted to go on unchecked, will sooner or later overturn the system itself, and introduce in its stead a settled pastorate. We may mention some of the causes which tend to produce this result. 1. The negotiations between ministers and pastoral charges for men and places during the interim of the conferences. 2. Stewards and other lay members of the charges coming up to conference, and selecting a man for their charge, and then besieging the bishop and his council till they secure the appointment. 3. Ministers selecting their fields of labor, and then importuning their presiding elder, or the bishop in person to make the appointment. This practice has already produced much friction in our itinerant machinery, and must erelong, if not corrected, stop the car altogether. As yet it is confined to a comparatively small number of ministers and charges. But if these have such rights and are permitted to exercise them, the time will come when all will claim them and insist on exercising them, and then adieu to our itinerancy.

Already if the bishop and his council were to speak out, we should hear of the obstructions which these practices have interposed in the way of a judicious arrangement of the appointments in the whole work, and of the trouble which they create every-

where.

We cheerfully concede the right of all the parties to represent fully their circumstances and wants to the appointing power; but no minister should select his charge, nor any charge choose its minister. This would leave the bishop and his council free to make all the appointments with a view to the best interests of the whole work, at the same time consulting personal accommodation and preferences as far as is consistent with the general good, and would thereby place all the ministers and pastoral

charges on a perfect equality.

The pastoral office properly includes the whole of a minister's work—preaching the Gospel, visiting the people, and exercising a wholesome moral discipline in the Church. In the Christian pastorate, preaching the gospel is the first and greatest work; but visiting the flock is scarcely less important, and always gives efficiency to the ministrations of the pulpit, and sometimes accomplishes even more than the ministry of the word. It should, therefore, be faithfully attended to by every minister of the Church, not only for the good of his people, but also for his own benefit.

But it is also a duty no less incumbent upon the members, and especially the official members of each pastoral charge, to see that the minister and his family are provided with a comfortable support, and to coöperate with him heartily in carrying forward all the interests of the Church committed to his care.

In view of these reciprocal duties of pastor and people, we offer

for adoption the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That it is the imperative duty, both of the pastors and people of our Church to abide strictly by the disciplinary regulations of the Church in the appointment of ministers to the various charges in the pastoral work.

2. Resolved, That we look upon the increasing tendency to depart from this feature of our Church economy, as operating injustice to a large portion of our ministry and membership, and thereby impairing the strength, efficiency, and perpetuity of the itinerant plan of spreading the Gospel.

3. Resolved, That it is the judgment of this conference that it would exert a salutary influence upon the general work, and tend to increase the vitality and efficiency of our itinerancy, if

there were a more general circulation of ministers from circuits to stations, and from stations to circuits.

4. Resolved, That we reaffirm our resolution of last conference in regard to special transfers to this conference; the principle of which was fully indersed by the late General conference.

CONSTITUTION

Of the Preachers' Relief Society of the Cincinnati Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, as amended September 10, 1860, at Oxford, O.

ARTICLE 1. This association shall be called the Preachers' Mutual Relief Society, for the benefit of infirm or worn-out itinerant ministers, and the widows and children of deceased preachers of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

ART. 2. The officers of this Society shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and nine Trustees, who shall be

elected annually by the Society.

ART. 3. It shall be the duty of the President, and in his absence of the Vice-President, at each annual conference to call a meeting of the Society, preside at said meetings, and the meetings of the Board of Trustees, and to perform such other duties as the

Board may direct.

ART. 4. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a book and record all the business of the Society and of the Board of

Trustees.

ART. 5. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to keep a faithful account of all moneys, legacies, and property received and moneys disbursed, and report the same to the Society annually. He shall not pay out any money without an order from the Trustees, signed by the President or Vice-President and approved by a majority of the members of the Society.

ART. 6. Every preacher becoming a member of this association, shall pay one dollar annually, to be funded by the Trustees as capital stock, and shall solicit donations to increase said capital; and all annual subscriptions, life memberships, donations, and bequests, shall be safely funded, and the interest only paid out for

the relief of claimants.

ART. 7. The benefit of all interests or funds arising from the funded capital of this Society shall extend to all the members of this association, their wives, widows, and children, and include the widows and children of deceased members of the Cincinnati conference; but if at any time the applications for assistance can not all be relieved by such funds, the most pressing cases shall be

ART. 8. In addition to the foregoing provisions, we, the members of this association, do hereby mutually agree that if any brother, member or members of this Society shall be in circumstances of need, this Society shall have power to levy, at any annual meeting, a direct tax, not exceeding five dollars each, in any year, upon its members, by a majority vote of the members of the Society, and collect and pay over the same to such claimant or claimants.

ART. 9. We, the members of this Society, for the protection of our wives and children, do hereby agree and bind ourselves, that on the death of any member of this association, each survivor will pay to the widow of such deceased brother, or to his child or children under eighteen years of age, the sums severally annexed to our names, as contained in a scale ranging from one to twenty dollars; provided, no one be required to pay more than the amount said deceased brother had subscribed, and others who subscribed less than the deceased be required to pay only the amount they severally subscribed. The amount of subscription of each member may, by him, be changed annually.

ART. 10. If any member, at the close of each conference year, fails to pay all the claims on him made by this Society under the Constitution, he shall not be released from his obligations, but shall be deprived of any and all claim upon this Society for him-

self and family till such arrearages are fully paid.

ART. 11. Any member of this Society shall not forfeit any of his rights or claims in consequence of a transfer to another conference, provided he shall continue to comply with the requirements of this Constitution.

ART. 12. Any member of our Church may become an honorary life member of this association, by paying ten dollars to the funds, and shall be entitled to a certificate.

ART. 13. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting of the Society, by a vote of a majority of all the members.

REPORT

On Sabbath Schools and Sabbath School Statistics.

OUR Sabbath school work is one of the great interests of the Church, and especially adapted to the religious education of the children and youth among us. We are glad to report that, from the information we have obtained, the Sunday schools within the bounds of our conference are steadily increasing, both in number and efficiency. In reporting the statistics which we have carefully collected and prepared, your Committee would ask the attention of the conference to some important particulars—which, if more generally attended to, we believe would greatly advance the work within our bounds. We therefore present the following for your consideration, namely:

1. That we should preach more frequently upon the importance of the religious training of children, upon the claims of the Sabbath

school work, and to the children of our charges.

2. That we should encourage the formation of our Sabbath schools into missionary societies, with some systematic plan of collections, and of meetings for awakening interest in behalf of the missionary cause.

3. That we should seek more fully to supply our schools with suitable periodicals—such as the Sunday School Advocate, Sunday School Bell, Good News, Teachers' Journal, Missionary Advocate. Now, about one paper to every three pupils is the ratio of circulation.

4. That our presiding elders should attend to the appointment of district committees, and encourage the holding of district con-

ventions for promoting the Sabbath school interest.

- 5. That we should take collections in all our charges in behalf of our Sunday School Union, unless there be good reason for omitting it. Our statistics of this year show the following: that in seventy-three American charges but twenty-three have reported collections, leaving fifty charges where the direction of the General conference, requiring collections to be taken, has been totally disregarded. In our German work it is better; in twenty-four charges seventeen have reported collections. Dr. Wise, our Corresponding Secretary, sends to us that if the Union is to continue its beneficent career, unembarrassed, the collections from the conferences must be increased.
- 6. That we should strictly attend to the requirement of our Discipline to organize Sunday schools wherever ten children can be found unprovided with the means of religious instruction.
- 7. That we labor to secure the continuance of the Sunday schools through the whole year.

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STEWARDS' REPORT.

Whereas, our hearts have been sorely grieved by the pressing wants and afflictions of our beloved fathers, worn out by long and arduous toil in the work of the Church, as also by the cries of the widow and orphan, to whom we would but can not grant relief, from the fact that our conference funds reach but little more than one-half what they did seven years ago—in 1853 our collection for conference claimants reached \$2,480; in 1860, as just reported, only \$1,863—see Stewards' Report—and whereas, our Church is abundantly able and fully willing to supply the wants of all such claimants; and whereas, many of our ministers do not seem to manifest that interest these suffering ones demand, in consequence of which our people are not applied to and enlightened in reference to the real wants and necessities of such claimants; therefore,

1. Resolved, That in accordance with the provision in Discipline, Part II, chapter i, section 4, item 9, each circuit and station, where any such claimant resides, appoint at the first quarterly meeting the Estimating Committee, who as soon as possible make up the estimate and forward to the Chairman of the Board of Stewards, who shall assess the aggregate of such estimate to each circuit and station according to its membership.

2. Resolved, That we affectionately urge every preacher not only to present but to enlighten the minds of his people, and urge the claim of those destitute ones.

3. Resolved, That the conference respectfully request that with the question, What amount collected for Missionary Society? be asked, What amount for conference claimants?

4. Resolved, That the stewards of circuits and stations are earnestly requested to close up their accounts with the preachers before they leave for conference, and that the preachers be prepared to report in full to the Stewards on the first day of the session.

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

MEMOIR OF REV. STEPHEN H. HOLLAND.

REV. STEPHEN H. HOLLAND, of the Cincinnati conference, was born near the town of Frederick, Frederick county, Maryland, April 6, 1806.

His parents moved to Ohio in 1812, the sixth year of Stephen's age, and settled in the south-eastern part of Clermont

county.

His mother—the mother of sixteen children—was a woman remarkable for her piety and Christian fortitude, which was most signally exemplified in the fact that, notwithstanding her husband was a non-professor, she erected the family altar, and day after day the morning and evening sacrifice of prayer and praise ascended to the Giver of every blessing.

The seeds of truth that had been sown in young Holland's heart by the training of a pious mother, and watered with the tears of maternal affection, were not lost, though he remained unconverted till his twenty-first year, which was after the death of her who had performed so faithfully the duties both of a parent and priestess in her own family.

The following incident will show the estimate that even an unconverted man puts on family worship. When brother Holland came from the camp meeting, where God had mercifully broken the fetters and set his sin-bound spirit free, his father said

"Now, Stephen, I want you to take your mother's place and have family prayer!"

This was an unexpected cross for the young soldier of Jesus, yet in the strength of Him who said, "My grace will be sufficient," he reërected the family altar, and, as in the days of his sainted mother, the incense of supplication and gratitude arose to heaven.

With great reluctance, he was very soon compelled to yield to the conviction that God had called him to the work of the The thoughts of the responsibilities and Christian ministry. privations of the itinerancy were too much for him to contem-plate, and in an hour of darkness his heart obstinately rebelled.

Now Satan took him, and for a time "sifted him as wheat, and so severe was the struggle in his mind, that he even resolved on taking his own life, rather than submit. Indeed, he went so far as to appoint the time and make preparations for this fearful suicidal act, when something seemed to say, "Young man, consider!"

He did consider, and yielded to the calls of God and his Church, most heartily and fervently sought forgiveness, and was wonderfully blessed.

He received license to exhort, August 1, 1830, and the succeeding May license to preach, and the following August was recommended as a suitable person to enter the traveling connection, and the same month was admitted on trial in the Ohio annual conference.

Brother Holland labored with great acceptability and success in the following fields, namely: Eaton, Granville, Rushville, Union, Bellefontaine, Wilmington, and Oxford. Now follow two years in which he was superannuated, and two in which he labored on Monroe circuit, at the close of which he was located at his own request.

He remained located eleven years, and in 1853 was readmitted, and traveled New Burlington and New Lexington circuits each two years, when his health again failing, he was again superannuated, in which relation he remained till his lamented

Brother Holland was for many years a great sufferer. In his younger days, and till the close of his fourth year in the itinerancy, he is said to have been as perfect a specimen of physical manhood as could be found; but while traveling Bellefontaine circuit, a frontier work, with W. I. Ellsworth, he was attacked with the milk-sickness, which so broke down his iron constitution that he never after enjoyed permanent health.

It was in consequence of ill-health, and a desire not to be dependent on the conference, that he was induced to locate. fact, when his health had failed, after his readmission, he never accepted his share of the fifth collection, but desired it should

be given to those more needy.

During the time of his location he was "diligent in business, fervent in spirit, serving the Lord," attending to all his religious duties, and preaching the unsearchable riches of Christ whenever an opportunity offered. While farming, however busy, he always detained his hands long enough for family worship, and was frequently heard to say that if he neglected his secret devotions every thing seemed to go wrong.

While located his conscience was ill at ease; yet he consoled himself with the thought that the precarious state of his health, and the duties he owed to his companion and five children, were

enough to excuse him from the regular pastoral work.

Providence, however, can soon take away excuses! Not only was he unfortunate in the loss of property, but four of his children were taken away by death in less than three weeks. He now felt it to be his imperative duty to again devote all his time in calling sinners to repentance, in which work his self-sacrific-ing companion always encouraged him, and as soon as the way opened he joined conference, with the full determination to remain a member till death.

As a man, perhaps his most noticeable trait of character was indomitable perseverance. Brother Holland's life was a living comment on the words of the wise man, "whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might." As a companion, he was very agreeable, taking great delight in conversation, which on his part was always chaste, instructive, and fascinating.

As a husband and father, he was kind and affectionate, making every provision, while with his family, for their comfort and

welfare when gone.

As a preacher brother Holland was above mediocrity. there were those who excelled him in systematic sermonizing, there were none more successful in winning souls to Christ.

He was a "workman that needed not to be ashamed." for

God set the seal of his approbation on his ministry.

As a colleague, brother H. was a model. Especially was he the young preacher's friend, always ready to counsel and encourage him, and never envying his popularity or success.

During brother Holland's protracted illness his "peace flowed as a river." His disease being that of bronchial consumption, he was prevented from conversing as freely as he would otherwise have done; yet what he did say was always to the point, and exhibited a hope "big with immortality."

One day, when I visited him, he looked up, while his eyes kindled with holy fire, and his countenance beamed with heavenly joy, and in a peculiarly-emphatic manner said, "This man is not afraid to die!"

When asked if his sky was clear he would answer, "Without a cloud." To Rev. J. M. Gatch and the writer he remarked, "The Gospel I have preached to others sustains and comforts me now." To one who visited him, referring to his late affliction, he expressed himself as never having had a doubt. Indeed, brother Holland was always a man of remarkable faith, and powerful in prayer.

When visited by brother M'Hugh, his last colleague, he said, "Farewell! Come up! come up!" For more than two years before his death he enjoyed that perfect love that casteth out all slavish fear, and when nearing the time of his dissolution, he was as one whose "trunk was packed, waiting for the coach."

When advised to trust in the merits of Christ he would re-

spond, "O, I have done that long ago!"

On January 10, 1860, in the fifty-fourth year of his age, at his residence, in Wilmington, Ohio, as sets the sun beneath a cloudless horizon, to rise again on the morning of a new day, so set his sun of life, with nothing to dim its luster, bathing in a sea of infinite love, to rise with increasing glory on the morning of eternity. At the time when the soul was taking leave of its clay tenement,

"A holy quiet reigned around, A calm which life nor death destroyed; And naught disturb'd that peace profoun Which his unfetter'd soul enjoyed."

The loss of the Church, and his companion and three children, is his eternal gain. THOMAS S. DUNN.

MEMOIR OF REV. WILLIAM KARTTER.

BROTHER WILLIAM KAETTER was born on the 15th of July, 1813, at Ladbergen, Kingdom of Prussia, Germany. He was early instructed in the doctrines of the Reformed Church, of which his parents were members. Often in his after life he was heard to speak with gratitude of the labors and instructions of a pious pastor, by whom the seed of life was sown in his heart when a boy, and watched over through the years of his youth. Pious parents, with whom he was blessed, also trained his heart for the Lord, and labored diligently for his conversion; but his father and mother both died before they saw that happy day. In order to prepare him for a happy reunion with his parents in heaven, and to accomplish his own purposes, God by his providence turned brother Kaetter's mind toward the western world. He left his father-land in the year 1840, and after a long and boisterous voyage reached safely the shores of the land of liberty. In the year 1844 he was led by the same providence to the German Methodist Church at Cincinnati, to hear the Gospel preached. He felt himself at once drawn with strong cords, but his companion in life at the same time strongly opposed him, and tried what she could to hinder his going there; but God so overruled the whole that in the course of a few weeks, she even hastened his connection with the Church, as well as his conversion. She was seized with the destructive disease of small-pox, which in a few days convinced her of death being near. Finding herself unprepared to meet her God, she now desired the instruction and prayers of the hitherto hated Methodist preacher. The Lord blessed his labors in the conversion of her soul; then she told her husband about the wonders of redeeming love, exhorted him not to delay seeking the same expe-

rience, and died the next day in great peace. This made a deep impression on his mind; "but deeper than this," he says in his diary, "the prayers of my mother now pierced my heart, and I consider her the chief instrument in my conversion. O, how blessed are the children who have pious parents-who have praying mothers!" His convictions soon became very deep-he was brought near the brink of despair; but after a long and hard struggle with unbelief, he found by faith the all-availing blood of redemption sufficient for him, and was made to rejoice in the Savior's love. After having served the Church as class-leader and exhorter, he was, in 1849, licensed to preach, and was received on probation in the Ohio conference, The next year he was ordained deacon by Bishop Janes, and in 1855 ordained elder by Bishop Morris. His last field of labor was the Captina circuit. On the 22d of August, 1859, after having made some pastoral visits, he came home in the evening sick; and though his sufferings soon became great, his patience was still greater. Perfectly resigned to the will of God, free from every fear of death, filled with heavenly peace and the hope of everlasting life, he comforted his weeping wife and children. While raising his hand and pointing heavenward, his last words were, "There is happiness." On the 12th of September last, while the conference was in session, and his appointment for another year was made out, he fell asleep in Jesus, to join the triumphant host in the land of eternal rest. Of him it might be said, "Look at the perfect man, and behold the upright, for the end of such is peace."

A humble tombstone, with the inscription, "They that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament, and they that turn many to righteousness as the sters forever," erected by the members of his last charge, marks the resting-place of his

mortal remains. But numerous monuments, costlier than worlds, and endurable forever, have been erected to his memory by the Holy Ghost on every field of labor where his Master and the Church sent him—he, under the blessing of God, has turned many to righteousness, and we will, we trust, see our deceased brother after a while shine as the stars forever.

MEMOIR OF REV. J. R. HALL.

REV. JESSE R. HALL was born in Highland county, Ohio, May 27, 1834. In early life he was awakened and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church as a seeker of salvation. Some time in the month of February, in the year 1850, he received a satisfactory evidence of his acceptance with God. Soon after his conversion he began to feel that a dispensation of the Gospel was committed to him. But not till the early part of the year 1854 was he thrust out by the Church. In that year Rev. William Simmons, presiding elder of the Hillsboro district, gave him license to preach, and carried his recommendation to the Cincinnati conference as a suitable person to be admitted to the traveling connection. He was admitted on trial and sent to the West Union circuit. The next year he traveled New Market circuit. At the close of his year on New Market circuit, he was ordained a deacon by Bishop Ames. September 16, 1856, he was married to Miss Martha A. Bagby, who now mourns his death. In the fall of 1856 he was sent to the Clarksville circuit, where he spent two years, at the end of which he was ordained elder by Bishop Janes, and appointed to Amelia circuit. His next and last field of labor was Fletcher circuit, where, on the last week of the present conference year, he ceased his labors and went to his reward. His last sickness was protracted and severe, but he never murmured or complained. From the first of his sickness, he expressed his belief that he would not recover. On the morning of his final prostration, he prayed most earnestly at the family altar that God would provide for his family, and take care of them when he should be gone. On the same morning he sat at the table with his family the last time. He ate nothing, but looking mournfully at his little boy, he said, "Poor little George, pa will never eat with you again," left the table, and went to his sick and dying couch. For four weeks he was scorched with a raging fever, a greater portion of the time entirely delirious. When his lucid moments would return with the abatement of his fever, he would speak in the most confident manner of his hopes of the future. In one of these lucid moments he said to his colleague, "Brother Black, I am very rich and very happy in the Lord; it is all right; bless his name!" At another time he said to the same,

"I want to sing, but the doctor says I must be quiet; you sing for me." On being asked what he wished to have sung, he said, "Sing

'How sweet the name of Jesus sounds In a believer's ears; It soothes his sorrows, heals his wounds, And drives away his fears.'''

And with a countenance beaming with inexpressible joy, he said, "O, how sweet!" and shouted aloud, "Salvation to Christ!"

During his sickness he said several times, "If I recover, I will preach Christ more faithfully than I have done before." After a lapse of some fifteen or twenty days of sickness, the disease seemed to abate, and many anxious hearts began to beat with high expectations of his recovery. But a few days sufficed to blast all expectations of this kind. He took cold, a relapse quickly followed, and he sank rapidly to the grave. August 30, 1860, at twenty minutes before 12 o'clock, M., he closed his eyes in death without a groan or struggle, his last words being, "I am going home this afternoon." His funeral was attended by a vast concourse of weeping friends. A discourse was delivered by Rev. D. Warnock, presiding elder of the district, from 2 Timothy iv, 6, 7.

Brother Hall was a good practical preacher, a good pastor, and an exemplary Christian; a pleasant colleague, a warm friend, a doting husband and father. But he early finished his work. One year ago he mingled among us at our annual convocation in good health, and bid fair to live long and accomplish much good; but he has fallen at his post—he is gone from the evil to come. He leaves a widow and orphan child to be cared for by the Church he faithfully served. May the God of the widow and orphan have them in his kind protection!
