



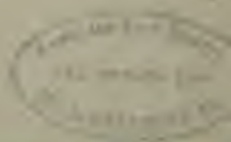

I.

DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

FIRST DAY.

FAIRBURY, ILL., THURSDAY, October 8th, 1885.

Opening Exercises.

The Central Illinois Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church met in the Methodist Episcopal Church in Fairbury, Ill., at 8:30 o'clock, A. M., Bishop Henry W. Warren presiding.

Bishop Warren read Luke 10 : 1-20, and II. Cor. 11 : 18-33, 12 : 1-10, and after the singing of the 798th Hymn, beginning, "And are we yet alive?" led the Conference in prayer, and then administered the sacrament of the Lord's Supper, assisted by the Presiding Elders. The Bishop then made a few appropriate remarks.

name, T. Doney was elected by a hand vote, and permitted to nominate his Assistants.

Work in Utah. W. H. Hunter moved that P. A. H. Franklin, of Utah, be invited to address the Conference, upon the needs of the Church in Utah, and after the address a collection was taken, amounting to \$54.80.

Charges. Charges were preferred against M. C. Eignus, and on motion a Select Number was ordered.

Counsel. J. E. Steele and E. S. Wilson were appointed Counsel for the Church, and Wm. Underwood and J. W. Haney were appointed Counsel of the accused.

The parties being asked, made no objections to any of the Select Number.

Conference Editor. On motion of R. Crewes, F. H. Cumming was appointed Conference Editor of the Daily Blade.

Lydia C. Clark. J. S. Cumming read the Memoir of Lydia C. Clark, adding his personal testimony to the deep piety and faithfulness of Mother Clark.

Mrs. Luceock. W. H. Hunter made some remarks in reference to the character and death of Sister Luceock.

Announcements were made. On motion the Conference adjourned. After the singing of the Doxology, the Benediction was pronounced by R. Haney.

FOURTH DAY.

MONDAY, OCTOBER 12th, 1885.

Conference met at 8 o'clock A. M., and after devotional exercises for half an hour, led by G. I. Bailey, Bishop Warren took the chair.

Special Com. on Sale. The Special Committee on sale of property within the bounds of Streator District, reported as follows:

Sale of Parsonage Property. Your committee, appointed to consider and report the direction of certain funds resulting from the sale of parsonage property, situated within the bounds of what at this time is known as Zion and Verona Circuit, after considering all the evidence we could gather upon the subject, respectfully recommend the payment of one hundred dollars by the trus-

tees of Ransom Parsonage into the hands of the trustees of Verona M. E. Church, for reinvestment in parsonage property.

According to orders no cents appear in these columns; hence some charges will be reported fractions of dollars less than they paid. But, where the Secretary was able, he added these fractions together, and gave credit for a dollar. For example, where report said \$50.30 for missions from Churches, and \$10.70 from Sunday School, the Church will be credited with \$51.00, or the Sunday School with \$11.00, so that the total will balance. So where report read S. S. Union \$2.50, and Tracts \$2.50, it will frequently appear that one of these is reported \$3.00 and the other \$2.00, so that the charge could have all the credit possible.

EDUCATION.

Your Committee on Education take pleasure in reporting as follows:

GARRETT BIBLICAL INSTITUTE.

We are gratified at the steadily increasing power of Garrett Biblical Institute for good. We recommend to all young men preparing for the ministry that they, as far as possible, take a full course of training for their work in this grand "School of the Prophets." We recommend Revs. F. H. Cumming and C. W. Ayling as visitors.

GRAND PRAIRIE SEMINARY.

Grand Prairie Seminary and Onarga Commercial College has had a year of increasing prosperity. During the first and second terms under President McClish the number of students was the same as in the corresponding terms of the previous year. The third term the number increased twenty-three per cent., and the present year opens with an increase of twenty per cent. over last year. The whole number of students last year was 289. The excellent teachers of the last year have been retained. The trustees in their last report say, "In the entire history of the school we have never felt so much of confidence in recommending the faculty, the school, the methods, and the character and amount of work done."

We are glad to report a large number of conversions and a good spirit of Christian work among the students.

The trustees respectfully request the appointment of Rev. Eli McClish, B. D., as president, and Rev. A. J. Newell, A. M., as teacher for the ensuing year; also Rev. Geo. R. Palmer, D. D., as financial agent. We further recommend as Conference Visitors, Revs. T. W. McVety, B. W. Baker, T. C. Clendening, J. W. Otterman, and W. R. Warner.

HEDDING COLLEGE.

We are glad to report the number of students in the literary department at Hedding College as larger than for years. The Normal department, organized under the present administration, is more largely attended than ever before. The time is passed when it is necessary for our young people to attend a secular school, to learn the science and art of teaching. Hedding College furnishes facilities unsurpassed in this di-

rection. A very large training class, organized during the Fall term, is doing fine work. A class of children from the public schools is taught weekly, thus illustrating the principles of Normal work. We rejoice in the peace and harmony of both students and Faculty, and regard this as the practical result of the religious spirit which has made Hedding the most noted of the schools in the patronage of our Conference. In the Department of Science, additional apparatus, recently purchased, will prove of great aid to students. Prof. Wilson expects to give a number of scientific lectures, using the new oxy-hydrogen Stereopticon as an illustrator.

Financially, we are glad to report a reduction of the old debt. The *Peabody Claim*, which has been such a burden for many years, is amiably adjusted. A subscription of negotiable and interest-paying notes, stands as the offset to the small debt still unpaid. As fast as these notes are paid, the debt will be reduced. A beginning on an Endowment Fund has been made; and by the untiring energy of the President, Rev. J. S. Cumming, D. D., \$6,000 in notes are already secured. We respectfully make the following recommendations:

1st. That Rev. G. J. Luckey and Rev. J. W. Haney, A. M., be elected to fill the vacancies in the Board of Trustees. That Rev. A. K. Tullis, Rev. B. E. Kaufman, Rev. William Wooley, A. M., Rev. C. O. McCulloch, J. H. Wilkinson, M. D., J. G. Walker, Esq., G. W. Butters, Esq., David A. Clark, Esq., be elected Trustees for the term which will expire in 1888.

2d. That Rev. W. H. Hunter, D. D., Rev. Thos. J. Wood, A. M., Rev. H. D. Clark, A. M., Rev. W. J. Minium, A. B., and Rev. W. A. Cumming be appointed Conference Visitors to the College.

3d. That Rev. J. S. Cumming, D. D., be appointed President, Rev. D. T. Wilson, A. M., Professor, and Rev. B. E. Kaufman, Soliciting Agent of Hedding College.

ILLINOIS WESLEYAN UNIVERSITY.

From the Treasurer's report submitted to your Committee, we are glad to report continued prosperity during the year in the several schools of the University.

We are glad to note in the report submitted the steady improvement of the financial interests of the institution, having secured an additional endowment of \$27,000.00 as the gift of one individual.

The attendance of students shows a decided increase over last year. The examinations at the close of the last scholastic year, as reported by your Visiting Committee, showed thorough and earnest work on the part of both students and professors.

Among the improvements made, we have noted specially important ones in the Laboratory, with valuable donations to the Museum, adding greatly to the facilities for teaching in the department of the natural sciences.

It gives us *great* pleasure to report a thorough revival work done in the halls of the University, resulting in the conversion of a considerable

number of the students and the awakening of all to a greater earnestness.

We recommend the election of Hon. O. T. Reeves, David T Douglas, M. D., Jos. B. Ayers and Geo. P. Davis as Trustees; also Revs. H. D. Clark, M. A. Head, C. O. McCulloch, C. W. Ayling, S. Van Pelt, and J. W. Frizzelle as Visitors.

We regret that, owing to the prevalent rain storm on Children's day, our collections, as reported, have fallen short of those of last year; and we hopefully look forward to a corresponding increase at the next Conference.

WHEREAS, The Board of Education has for many years aided worthy young men seeking an education to better fit them for the work of the ministry, and for other important work, therefore

Resolved, That so far as concerns preaching on education and taking up a collection for this purpose, we will not mend our rules, but keep them.

Resolved, That we deem it unwise and inexpedient to divert moneys raised for this purpose out of the ordinary channel, feeling assured that greater and better results will be secured in following the plan laid down by the General Conference.

TEMPERANCE.

To a body of Christian ministers the Bible is highest authority.

According to this authority strong drink leads to poverty. "The drunkard and the glutton shall come to poverty." Strong drink leads to sorrow and strife. "Who hath woe? who hath sorrow? who hath contention? who hath babbling? who hath wounds without cause? who hath redness of eyes? They that tarry long at the wine, they that go to seek mixed wine." The use of strong drink is a work of the flesh. "The works of the flesh are these: Adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lasciviousness, idolatry, witchcraft, hatred, variance, emulations, wrath, strife, seditions, heresies, envyings, murders, drunkenness, revelings, and such like."

The use of strong drink excludes from Heaven. "Nor thieves, nor covetous, nor drunkards, nor riotous, nor extortioners shall inherit the Kingdom of God." To engage in the traffic of strong drink incurs the curse of heaven. "Woe unto him that giveth his neighbor drink, that putteth the bottle to him and maketh him drunken also."

To a Conference of ministers in the Methodist Episcopal Church, the highest formulated ecclesiastical authority is the book of Discipline. The general rule on this subject forbids, "drunkenness, the buying or selling spirituous liquors or drinking them, unless in cases of extreme necessity." The chapter on temperance asserts: "Both science and human experience agree with the Holy Scriptures in condemning all alcoholic beverages as being neither useful nor safe. The business of manufacturing or vending such liquors is also against the principles of moral-

ity, political economy and the public welfare. We therefore regard total abstinence from all intoxicants as the true ground of personal temperance and complete legal prohibition of the traffic in alcoholic drinks as the duty of civil government. The last General Conference said: "We are unalterably opposed to the enactment of laws that propose by license, taxing or otherwise to regulate the drink traffic, because they provide for its continuance, and afford no protection against its ravages. We hold that the proper attitude of Christians towards this traffic is one of uncompromising opposition." To a company of American citizens the Constitutions of the State and Nation are highest civil authority. Both of these Constitutions recognize the actual power and authority of government as vested in the people. Therefore be it

Resolved, 1st. As *Christian* ministers we will clearly declare to our people the plain teaching of Holy Scripture upon this subject: Strong drink and poverty; strong drink and crime; strong drink and damnation are inseparable.

Resolved 2nd. As ministers of the *Methodist Episcopal Church* our endorsement of the book of Discipline so far as we a personally concerned, and so far as we can influence our people, shall be practical as well as theoretical. Practical in this; total personal abstinence; unalterable opposition to laws that propose by "license, tax or otherwise to regulate the drink traffic;" in a non-allowance of ourselves to be controlled by "political affiliations or party organizations that are managed in the interest of the drink traffic"; in an earnest maintenance of the doctrine "that complete legal prohibition of the trade in intoxicating drinks is the duty of civil government.

Resolved, 3rd. As citizens of the Commonwealth of Illinois and of the Republic of the United States, we recognize the sovereignty of the people; hence we cannot divorce civil and religious responsibility. Our political allegiance is to moral principle first, to political party second, and any organization whatever attempting to abrogate or limit our right to vote against that which injures the individual and the home, the social civil, and moral interests of society, we will most earnestly resist.

Resolved, 4th. We have not been wanting in our attention to the position taken upon this subject by the great political parties of to-day, "We have warned them from time to time of attempts made" to protect and extend this accursed trade. "We have reminded them of the circumstances surrounding" them and us. "We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity. We have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred," to disavow and seek the prohibition of this trade. "But in large measure they have been deaf to the voice of justice and humanity." We must therefore hold them as we hold other organizations, "enemies in war, friends in peace."

Resolved, 5th. We cannot condemn a political party because it takes as a fundamental plank in its platform the doctrine of prohibition to this traffic; which doctrine we as a church, have made a part of our ecclesiastical law and recognize as a part of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Resolved, 6th. We bid a hearty God-speed to all societies, periodicals and other agencies seeking the overthrow of the traffic in rum.

Resolved, 7th. We respectfully request the Bishops to appoint Rev. R. Haney, D. D., as Conference Temperance Agent for the ensuing year.

CONFERENCE TEMPERANCE SOCIETY.

WHEREAS, The General Conference of 1884 recommended the Annual Conference to organize Temperance Societies, and

WHEREAS, Such a society may be an efficient agency in promoting the temperance reform to which our church is so strongly pledged; therefore

Resolved, That a Conference Temperance Society be organized by the adoption of the following

CONSTITUTION.

ART. I. This Society shall be known as the Central Illinois Conference Temperance Society.

ART. II. The officers of this Society shall consist of a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, who, with five additional members, shall form a Board of Managers, all of whom shall be elected annually, and shall perform the duties common to such offices.

ART. III. The object of this Society shall be to promote the temperance reform in accordance with the sentiments of the church as expressed in the Discipline, urging total abstinence as the duty of the individual, and constitutional prohibition as the duty of both State and Nation. The Board of Managers shall, as far as possible, aid pastors and temperance committees in the creation of public sentiment on this subject, by the distribution of temperance literature and by public meetings in the interests of this cause.

ART. IV. The regular meetings of this Society shall be held annually during the Conference week, at such time as may be agreed upon by the President and the Committee on Public Worship.

ART. V. All members of the Central Illinois Annual Conference shall be members of this Society.

ART. VI. This Constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Society.

STATE OF THE CHURCH.

With church property worth more than one million, one hundred and fifty thousand dollars, almost entirely free from debt; with ability and disposition to support our own churches and Sunday Schools at an annual expenditure of nearly one hundred and sixty thousand dollars; a benevolence of spirit that prompts the giving of nearly thirty thousand dollars for the work of the church outside our territory, we are warranted in saying that, in these aspects of the subject, if they are not all we could desire, they are very full of encouragement, and afford material foundation for very large plans, very earnest work and very great success. With a membership, one year ago, including our probationers, of twenty-

two thousand five hundred, to which, if we add the twenty-five hundred converted during the past year, we are surely, as far as members are concerned, in a condition to sow and reap and gather an immense harvest. The fact that this number has been brought to Christ is clearest evidence of Divine presence, spiritual life and aggressive power. Certain questions proposed by the Bishop to some brethren whose charges have been peculiarly blessed, indicate that our preachers are learning the art of so caring for the lambs of the flock in the way of special instruction in the Holy Scriptures; special instruction in Christian living, and special instruction in church privileges and responsibility, as to save to the church and to Christian life nearly all who are brought to Christ through their instrumentality. With all of these things and many other things like them, characteristic of the church, there is yet reason to believe that there are those among us of whom the Master could not say in the matter of benevolence or Christian activity, that which he did of the widow: "She hath done what she could."

It cannot be denied there is often an evident want of thought, laxity of view and practice upon the part of some of our people with regard to the observance of the Sabbath as a day holy unto the Lord. We do not always find that faithful attendance upon the prayer meeting and public worship, nor yet those means of grace peculiar to our church, the class-meeting and the love-feast that should characterize the people called Methodists.

While all our people are professed advocates of temperance and are committed by the Discipline of the church and their own vows to work for the legal prohibition of the liquor traffic, it must yet be confessed there are those in our communion whose principles upon this subject seem to be nearly or quite all sentiment, and that sentiment too weak for practical development. It is necessary that the attention of our people, and especially our young people, be more frequently called to the latter part of paragraph 233 of the Discipline. It should be more clearly understood that the *law* of the church, as well as its sentiments and teaching, is against "dancing, playing of games of chance, attending theatres, horse races, circuses, dancing parties or patronizing dancing schools, or taking such other amusements as are obviously of misleading or questionable moral tendency." Among these "other amusements" of questionable moral tendency, we must place the Skating Rink, and we do most earnestly request all of our communion to seek its discontinuance in every place.

Sometimes we find our church periodicals and other literature are not appreciated and circulated as their merits, and the interest of the people demand. We believe that no family of our church can afford to be without its church paper and a carefully selected library of Methodist books. Therefore be it

Resolved, 1st. That we, as ministers of the church, will be examples to the flock in all practical as well as theoretical benevolence and devotion.

Resolved, 2nd. We will not fail to warn our people of the danger threatening the usefulness, if not the very existence of the church, if we

lose our first love; if we turn to worldly or sinful amusements for our pleasure; if we fail to develop our opportunities or to earnestly resist every temptation to worldliness, to laxity in morals, doctrine or discipline.

S. finding 83,622 families destitute of Bibles, incurring in the prosecution of this work an expense of \$619,882.58, while its receipts were \$31,968 less than its expenses, and

WHEREAS, The M. E. Church has been heartily co-operating with the American Bible Society for over forty years, always recognizing its helpfulness in all our Missionary work, especially in foreign fields, we learn with regret that our contributions to that Society are not now as large as they were fifteen years ago; therefore

Resolved, 1st. That we fully endorse the action of our General Conference in 1884, as printed in paragraph 567 of our Discipline, in regard to the American Bible Society.

Resolved, 2nd. That, in view of the fact that the American Bible Society offers to supply a copy of the *Bible Society Record* gratis to each of our pastors who will take a collection for that Society, we would earnestly recommend that our brethren accept this offer, and that they

give this Society more zealous support by preaching on the subject of its work, and by taking collections in our own churches when other arrangements are not made by the Society itself in the bounds of our charges.

VII.

MEMOIRS.

REV. URIEL JOSIUA GIDDINGS,

was born March 16th, 1813, in Coos County, New Hampshire. He was converted when sixteen years old at a campmeeting under the charge of Revs. John Kent and A. Plimpton, in Erie county, Pa., and soon after received into the M. E. Church by Rev. John Chandler, late of the Central Illinois Conference. Licensed to exhort Aug. 6th, 1839, by Asa D. West. He was licensed to preach at a Quarterly Conference held at Cox's camp ground, Warren County, Illinois, August, 1840. Rev. Newton G. Berryman, P. E. A part of the year following he supplied Monmouth Circuit, also a part of the year 1843-4.

In November, 1844, Rev. Luke Hitchcock, Presiding Elder of Ot-tawa District, Rock River Conference, employed him to take charge of Mercer Circuit. In 1845 he was received on trial by the Rock River Conference, and ordained a deacon by Bishop Morris. He was returned to Mercer Circuit, which was put into Peoria District, Rev. Richard Haney, Presiding Elder. He served successively the following charges:—Mercer two years, Marietta one year, Farmington one year, Middleport two years, Brimfield two years, La Harpe two years, Carthage two years, agent Hancock County Bible Society one year, Camden Mills one year, Red Oak Grove one year, Victoria two years, Kewanee two years, Port Byron one year and part of the second, when he was transferred to the Missouri Conference. What charges he served in Missouri I cannot state. He was transferred back to the Central Illinois Conference in 1869, and appointed to Groveland Circuit, in 1870 to Spring Lake, 1871 to Union and Towanda, 1872 Lexington, 1873 Chenoa, and here finished his pastoral work. In 1874 he superannuated, and continued in that relation until his death.

Bro. Giddings was twice married; first to Amanda M. Stafford, January 18th, 1835, who died October 30, 1858; to Martha E. Rose, March 19, 1859, who survives to mourn his death. To the first marriage were born ten children, to the second two children. As far as known nine children are living; all but one I believe are religious.

Brother Giddings was a man of more than ordinary natural ability; he had a retentive memory, quick perception, a ready utterance, and a clear ringing voice. As a preacher he was practical, and sometimes truly eloquent; his aim always seemed to be to convince and instruct, and he succeeded to a creditable degree. He was gifted in prayer.

I met him first at camp meeting at Riason's camp ground, in Henderson County, in May, 1840. I was but eleven years old, but the prayers and exhortations I heard from him at that meeting made impressions upon my mind which have never been effaced, especially the prayers he offered for seekers of religion. His piety was of a cheerful type. There was nothing like "sour godliness" in his religious life. There were defects in his character, but this was not one of them. He was a constant and devoted friend. Through nearly 45 years I proved him in this relation, and never found him wanting. More than forty years ago he received me into the church, and with loving devotion watched over me as my pastor for nearly two years. Perilous years they were, too, for my surroundings were not favorable for the beginning of the religious life of a timid boy, but God gave me as my spiritual father a man who knew how to wisely direct my steps.

In his family he was faithful and affectionate, not remarkably demonstrative, but tenderly mindful of every thing which contributes to the comfort of wife and children, or tends to secure their highest interests.

He had a strong physical constitution, and most of his life enjoyed good health. About three years before his death he had a paralytic stroke, from which he never wholly recovered. About six weeks before his death he was seized with a trouble of the heart, something he had never known before; a few days later he was attacked with pneumonia, which terminated fatally April 29, 1885. "His end was peace." Two days before he died he said to his wife: "For four months not a cloud has come between me and my blessed Jesus." And almost to the end he continued to signal to his family and friends his triumph in the blessed Saviour.

REV. G. W. BURNS.

Rev. George William Burns was born in Wheeling, W. Va., June 20, 1834, and died in Kewanee, Oct. 14, 1884, where he had gone to attend the session of his Annual Conference.

At the age of nineteen he made a profession of faith in Christ, and united with the Methodist Protestant Church, of which his father was, for many years, a prominent minister. At the age of 22 he graduated at Madison College, Union Town, Pa., after having taken a classical course, and the following year entered the itinerant ministry of the aforementioned Church, thus giving some 15 or 16 years of efficient ministry to that Church, a part of the time associating the work of teaching as Principal of a High School, with that of the pastorate. Later in life he also graduated from a Commercial School, in the city of Pittsburg, Pa.

When the M. E. Church incorporated lay representation into its polity, it became the Church of his choice, and he legally and honorably changed his ecclesiastical relations, and was admitted into our Conference about 12 years ago. He had rendered about 11 years of efficient service among us, and had been re-appointed to Chenoa charge for the second year.

Bro. B. was highly esteemed among his brethren as a Christian gentleman, a companionable brother, and an efficient Gospel minister. For

several years he was our authorized Conference reporter, and one of the most competent we ever had. He had been in feeble health for several weeks before the meeting of his Conference, and was scarcely able to attend the session of that body. He grew very much worse after attending one or two days. It was on Saturday afternoon of the Conference that he took his bed and sent word to Dr. Adams, of the Ill. Wesleyan, that he was very sick, and for him to come and see him. The Dr. went, and found him as he had said, very sick indeed, and when he took final leave of him on the following Monday afternoon, Dr. Adams said he had the impression somehow that he was shaking hands with him for the last time. He tried to repel the thought, but the thought would obtrude itself into his mind.

As soon as Conference had adjourned, which was Monday afternoon, Bro. F. H. Cumming, our pastor at that place, had Bro. Burns removed to his own home, (the parsonage,) where he remained until his decease, and where he received the best of attention and had the best medical help that the place could afford. His attending physician, Dr. Lowe, of Kewanee, after a thorough diagnosis, pronounced it a malignant case of blood poisoning, with one or two very unfavorable chronic attendants, pulmonary and heart difficulties.

The following is in substance the testimony of Bro. F. H. Cumming, who was with him, and personally ministered to him much of the time after he was removed to the parsonage, which was about 15 or 16 days: "From the beginning of his sickness to its close, I never heard him utter a word of impatience or of insubordination to the will of God. It was a hopeful, trustful resignation to the will of the blessed Master. He was perfectly conscious until about thirty minutes before his departure. He conversed very freely about his hope of a glorious immortality. He said repeatedly, with much fervor of soul, 'I am ready to go, or willing to stay, just as the Lord wills.' 'I would like to stay for the children's sake, and help to take care of them, but just as the Lord wills.' During the days and nights of his sickness, as Sister Burns and other friends were ministering to his wants, the following expressions were often heard from his lips: 'Precious Savior,' 'Blessed Jesus,' and many similar expressions of the most triumphant assurance of complete victory over death. At his request, Bro. Cumming sang and played a number of soul-stirring, spiritual songs, to his great delight, and sometimes he would join in and sing. A few days before his departure he requested Bro. C. to sing and play that sweet song, beginning, "I am dwelling on the mountain," with the chorus, "Is not this the land of Beulah." After Bro. C. had played and sang one verse, Bro. Burns joined in and sang with him. When he came to the last verse "I have tasted of life's river, and my soul is satisfied," Bro. B. commenced shouting and praising God aloud, while his face beamed with the radiance of almost ecstatic joy. As he neared the parting hour he grew more and more triumphant, and yet self-possessed. One expression among others that he used a day or two before he left us was, "Talk about valley. Talk about shadow." "There is no shadow. It is all light here." And to Sister B. he would sometimes say, looking upward, "Mother, don't you

see them?" "Can't you hear them?" And as would be natural in an affectionate parent, his children, though absent, were among the last things that occupied his thoughts. When his mind began to wander, through the failing of physical faculties, he said, "Have the children come?" Shortly after which he quietly passed away.

Bro. B. had an ardent desire to excel as a Methodist minister, and was constantly planning for the success of his work. He had also matured plans for the proper education of his children. He was a man of no ordinary degree of energy and industry; was a diligent reader of a wide range of the best authors, as a glance at his large library will readily show. But few men among us are better posted in Methodist ecclesiastical biographical history, and Methodist doctrines and usages, than he was. It is doubtful whether, had he known that it was to be his last year on earth, he could have preached with more zeal and consuming fervor to save souls. He said more than once, in substance if not in so many words, "I wish to preach as faithfully, and labor as earnestly, as if it was to be my last year on earth."

He left his work in such a shape on his last charge as to be easily and readily resumed after his return from Conference. But God had another and a very different appointment for him. His work was done. And from the seat of the annual assembly of his brethren on earth,—after they had all left and gone to their various fields of toil, he remained in Kewanee some two or three weeks after the Conference had adjourned—he was called to the General Assembly and Church of the First-born, who stand before the throne of God on high.

Bro. B. was called from labor in the meridian of his usefulness, when he was best qualified, by ripe experience and culture, to do the most efficient work. (For about 27 years it had been his privilege to be present to answer to his name at roll-call.) He literally fell at his post, with his face Zionward. That same Gospel which he had recommended so faithfully to others, and which he had found to be so full of comfort to his own soul while living, was the same unchangeable, all-sufficient reality when the closing hours of life came.

During his sickness he told Bro. F. H. Cumming that he had kept a register of all the persons he had ever received into the Church during his ministry, and that they aggregated nearly, or about, 800 souls, and that so far as he could learn, nearly all, or most of them, continued faithful.

"Servant of God, well done,
Thy glorious warfare's past;
The battle's fought, the victory won,
And thou art crowned at last."

"Asleep in Jesus! Far from thee
Thy kindred and their graves may be;
But thine is still a blessed sleep,
From which none ever wake to weep."

WILLIAM M'KENDER CLARK

was born in Bourbon County, Kentucky, July 26th, 1805, and died at his home in Abingdon, Ill., Jan. 18th, 1885, aged 80 years. He lived in

his native State 18 years, in Indiana 12, and in Illinois 49 years. He was a professor of religion 64 years, and a Methodist preacher 59 years.

He was married to Lydia Carmichael in Cook County, Indiana, Sept. 3d, 1826. They had thirteen children, five of whom died in infancy, and two after they were grown and heads of families. One son lives in Kansas and one in Arkansas. Four of the children live in Illinois. One son, Asbury, is a local preacher, and another, Newton G., is a member of this Conference. All but one of the children are members of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

He was converted in 1820, licensed to exhort in 1825; licensed to preach in 1826; received on trial in the Indiana Conference in 1833; was ordained Elder by Bishop R. R. Roberts at Lafayette, Ind., Oct. 21st, 1835. His first circuit was large, having twenty-eight appointments, requiring 460 miles travel in four weeks. He located and came to Illinois in 1836, and joined the Illinois Conference in 1838. When the Conference was divided in 1844 his lot fell in the R. R. Conference, and when the R. R. Conference was divided in 1856 he became a member of the Central Illinois Conference, of which he was a member at the time of his death. Among the circuits he traveled in this Conference were the following: 1838, Canton, with the eccentric Wilson Pitner; 1839 and '40, Monmouth; 1841, Farmington; 1842, Lafayette; 1848, Mercer; 1849, Macomb; 1850, Lafayette; 1858, Oneida.

For several years before his death he was a superannuated member of this Conference. As a preacher, in the days of his efficiency he was much more than an ordinary preacher, preaching the doctrines faithfully, expounding and aptly quoting the Holy Scriptures. He was not only a good preacher but a good hearer. There are members of the Conference who can never forget the inspiration that came from his earnest, tearful eyes, and his hearty responses to the truth.

During much of life he was subject to changes in religious experience. Sometimes he was jubilant, and sometimes greatly depressed. But for a few years before his death he seemed to be ripening for heaven. Often during the last few weeks, especially after his wife had gone to heaven, he spoke of his waiting to go, and the hope of meeting the dear ones who had passed on before. On Saturday evening, Jan. 17th, being in a state of stupor, requiring an effort to arouse him, a friend called to see him, and after being awakened he expressed his confidence in Jesus, then went to sleep, and awakened, as we confidently believe, in glory.

We miss him in the Church and in the Conference room, but he has gone to join the glorious company of his early associates, Armstrong, Strange, and others whose names were so frequently upon his lips, who are now before the throne.

LYDIA CARMICHAEL CLARK

was born in North Carolina, July 17, 1808, and died at her home in Abingdon, Ill. Dec. 9, 1884. Early in life she came with her parents to Indiana, where she became acquainted with Wm. McKender Clark, whom she married, and with whom she lived for more than 58 years. She was the mother of thirteen children, two of whom are Methodist ministers; one

Asbury Clark, of Kansas, and one, Newton G. Clark, a member of the Central Illinois Conference. Of the many remarkable women that God gave the early Methodist Church in this country, Mother Clark was one. A woman of great intellectual vigor and moral strength, she affected all who came in contact with her as few women or men could. Her strong mind, saintly life, and knowledge of the deep things of God gave her a commanding influence wherever she went. She was a peacemaker; dissensions died out in her presence, and her example was a constant stimulus to good and kindly deeds.

Of all the history of the deceased her religious experience was the most interesting. She experienced religion in her father's house in July, 1826, and experienced the blessing of Entire Sanctification at Riason's camp ground in Henderson County, Ill., September 7th, 1841, and in a few moments after received, as she declared to the day of her death, that remarkable cure of an eating cancer in the left breast, known to scores who were upon the camp ground, many of whom still survive.

During all the following years of trial and warfare she never lost the blessedness and joy of her first consecration. A woman of remarkable faith and wonderful power to move people in the relation of her religious experience, "her name is as ointment poured forth." Her last sickness was long and painful, but her communion with God was unbroken. Her utterances during those weeks of suffering, and especially as she neared the Jordan of death, were wonderful. She seemed, while lingering on the shores of time, to be breathing the atmosphere of heaven. She was a loyal, loving, true and tender wife, mother, and friend. Peace to her memory. She has entered into rest.

REV. JOHN LUCCOCK, D. D.

Rev. John Luccock, D. D., a superannuated member of the Central Illinois Conference, died at Half Moon Bay, California, September the 9th, 1885, aged 81 years and 11 months. He was born in England, and converted in early life. Coming to this country in early life, he was admitted as a probationer in the Pittsburg Conference in 1832. Ordained a Deacon in 1834, and an Elder in 1836. At the formation of the Erie Conference in 1836, he became a member of that body, and served in the best charges in the Conference, with great acceptability and usefulness, showing himself to be an able minister of Christ. In 1846 he located, and in 1847 his name appears in the Rock River Conference, where he remained filling important charges until 1856. By the division of Rock River Conference he became a member of the Peoria, now Central Illinois Conference, where he remained in active work, as pastor and presiding elder, leading on the Israel of God to victory. In all his appointments he showed himself to be an able defender of the faith, "once delivered to the saints." He felt that he was "set for the defense of the gospel," and was ready to expose error in every form in which it appeared.

No man ever labored more diligently to fulfill his ordination vow than he; always ready to drive away all erroneous and strange doctrines from the church of God, that the faith of the people might not stand in the wisdom of man, but in the power of God. Advanced in years, and

worn by hard labor in the Master's work, in 1874 he asked and obtained a superannuated relation, in which he continued until death.

Dr. Luccock was a good man, a true friend, an affectionate husband, a kind father. In distant California, Christian hands laid the faithful warrior down to rest, in sure and certain hope of a glorious resurrection at the last day. Peace to his ashes.

MRS. MARY LUCCOCK,

wife of Rev. John Luccock, D. D., died at her home in California, May the 7th, 1885, aged 82 years.

Mrs. Luccock was the wife of an itinerant minister for more than sixty years, and bore with great courage and cheerfulness, the toils and sacrifices incident to the life of the wife of a Methodist minister. In those days we had but few churches; parsonages were a novelty; two or three rooms in some secluded place was the home of the preacher, with a salary ranging from two to four hundred dollars for the support of a dependent family.

We of this generation know but little of the toils and sacrifices endured by the elect ladies who went forth as the wives of God's ministers, in laying the foundations of our Methodism. To this work Mrs. Luccock was called, and well and faithfully did she fulfill her mission.

She was a Christian, possessing a high reverence for God and His precious word, and valued highly all the ordinances of His house. Modest and retiring in her manners, she did not make an outward display of religion to gain the applause of the world, but in the meek and quiet spirit which, in the sight of God, is of great price, she pursued her way, looking for her reward in the heavenly world. She died in great peace. She was not disappointed; the foundation was firm. The everlasting God was her refuge and strength in the trying hour. She was an affectionate mother, and has left to her children, whom she loved so tenderly, a legacy more valuable than silver or gold—a mother's prayers and Christian example.

VIII.

SEMI-CENTENNIAL SERMON.

PREACHED BY REV. R. HANEY, D. D., BEFORE THE CENTRAL ILLINOIS
CONFERENCE, OCTOBER 9, 1885, AND PUBLISHED BY
REQUEST OF CONFERENCE.

Text—Isaiah 35: 1. "The wilderness and the solitary place shall be glad for them: and the desert shall rejoice, and blossom as the rose."

Fifty years ago, the Illinois Conference embraced within its bounds the State of Illinois, that part of the State of Indiana West of the Wabash river, Iowa, Wisconsin, and Minnesota. The Minutes of the Illinois Conference of '35 show seventy-six traveling ministers. Of this number, only eleven are alive. Jesse Walker, in point of time, stands first. Bishop Asbury, in 1807, sent him to explore the Illinois country. Walker preached in St. Louis the first Protestant sermon ever preached in that place; and erected the second church edifice of which we have any record, in the Mississippi Valley. The Dodridge meeting house, in Western Pennsylvania, being first, having been built in 1803. Father Walker died June 5th, 1835, on the Mission Farm, nine miles West from where Chicago now stands,—where he spent the last ten years of his life, among the Pottowattoma Indians as Conference Missionary. If men are to be judged by what they accomplish, it may truthfully be said of the men God raised up here in the West, to lay the foundations on which coming generations are to build, until the end of time; that in labors, and self-sacrifices, they have not been surpassed since the days of the Apostles. No railroads then as now—mounted upon horseback—they went everywhere, and when the Western emigrant moved into his log cabin, the itinerant was at the door. In those days, the salary of a single man was one hundred dollars; for a married man two hundred dollars; and seldom were these amounts received. Their fields of labor were hard, and often hundreds of miles away; yet we never heard a murmur or complaint.

The few old men we had among us, had seen service with Coke and Asbury. None doubted his call from God, and feeling the vows of the Master upon him, he preached in demonstration of the spirit, and with the Holy Ghost sent down from Heaven: and history will tell to the end of time, how they did their work. Those were the days, when God's ministers were flames of fire. Rev. John Chandler, late of our Conference, and Bishop Roberts, sub-

sisted three days on blackberries,—their money having given out, and Peter Cartwright was with Bishop Asbury, when the Bishop sold his shirt to the ferryman to pass him and his preachers over the Holston river.

From within the bounds of what was once the Illinois Conference, may be found to-day men and women, in every zone on the face of the earth, toiling for Jesus,—in India, China, Japan, Mexico, South America, and to-day our own young Davenport, with Bishop Taylor, is kindling the watch-fires upon the table lands in the center of Africa. Among the men who rode leaders in every battle-field in the early days, and who will never be forgotten, was Peter Cartwright, that man without a model, or a master on earth. He had attended fourteen General Conferences; and never, in his long and eventful life, gave a vote the church ever repealed. This can truthfully be said of few. Dr. Akers, the peer of Bishop Usher in chronology. This great man is still living. Charles Holliday, first Book Agent at Cincinnati; John Dew, first president of McKendree College; Samuel H. Tompson, John S. Barger, A. E. Phelps, M. S. Taylor, John St. Clair, Hooper Crews, Alfred Bronson; we cannot here name them all. Their record is on high. Peter R. Borein, whose memory is “as ointment poured forth.” Under the ministry of this gifted brother, Mrs. Eliza Garrett was converted, while he labored in Chicago; where he died in holy triumph forty-six years ago. This elect lady was the founder of the school that bears her name, for the education of young men who are preparing for the Christian ministry. Half a century ago, Rev. James B. Findley, then missionary among the Wyandotte Indians, at Upper Sandusky, Ohio, wrote the Rev. S. G. Russell, of the Baltimore Conference, asking for a box of clothing for the Indian children in his mission. The box was sent, and with it a purse of money, and a letter, in which Russell said, “Brother Findley, I really believe the time will come when the M. E. Church will raise \$10,000 a year for missions. This year she reaches the million line. Fifty years ago, our Book Concern was in its infancy; to-day we have the greatest publishing house in Christendom. During the time of which we speak France has changed her form of government four times; Russia manumitted her slaves; the Pope of Rome ceased to be a temporal prince, and has become a subject like any other Italian.

In 1846 we dismembered Mexico, and annexed some of her richest states. In 1861 the civil war was upon us, and from '61 to '65, our government was tried as by fire. Mason and Dixon's line was blotted out, and with it slavery disappeared.

From the days Bishops Coke and Asbury waited on President Washington, and informed him that the Methodists were friends of civil liberty, to the day when President Lincoln said, “The Methodists have sent more soldiers to the front, more nurses to the hospital, and more prayers to Heaven than any of the churches, because she outnumbered any other. Thank God for the M. E. Church, and for all the churches God has given us in this, our day of terrible trial.” From the time of Mr. Wesley to the Rebellion, our church preached and wrote against slavery, yet it increased and grew upon our hands, but, when the time came for slavery to die, the Methodist Episcopal Church, if not the only one, was the first that moved the President that slavery be ended; and the Central Illinois Conference was the first Ecclesiastical body on this

Continent to move President Lincoln to proclaim the freedom of every slave in these United States. This has become history, and can never be denied. The action of our late General Conference on the subject of temperance, surprised and astonished the civilized world. She has placed in her book of discipline her declaration for the utter prohibition of the fearful curse, which results from the manufacturing and sale of intoxicating liquors, by constitutional enactment, both State and National.

Here, as usual, our church is in the advance. She never studies policy; when a crying sin, against God and man, comes before her, she never studies the line of retreat; nor sends engineers to find some way to flank the position. She never forgets that truth is eternal, and to compromise with evil is to abandon God, and to be abandoned by Him. God cannot compromise with evil, and the church will never undertake to accomplish what God cannot do.

One hundred years ago Mr. Wesley said, "God's object in raising up the people called Methodists, was to spread scriptural holiness over these lands." And in all these years, we think it safe to say of our church, that, wherever she is found, she is preparing the way for the coming of the Lord. In 1818, when the convention met to form the first constitution of this state; of the seven delegates, one was a Methodist, Samuel G. Morse, who held the balance of power, and, but for him the constitution would never have been referred to the vote of the people to say whether Illinois should be a free or a slave state. Then says Governor Ford in his history of Illinois: "The Methodists stood up for liberty, and against slavery, and the voice of her ministers could be heard in every neighborhood, and, to them, Illinois owes her greatness to-day."

And where did our church ever betray a trust God gave her to do? And as Solomon said of his daughter; without boasting we may say of the church we love so well, "Many daughters have done virtuously, but thou excellest them all." The greatest religious event which has transpired in the Nineteenth century, we name the action of our late General Conference on temperance. That action is the trumpet sounding the jubilee of the world. In 1832 we owned and controlled but one institution of learning West of the Ohio river, Norwalk Seminary. To-day our Universities, Colleges, and other institutions of learning are seen all over our fields of labor; and some of them have an endowment of more than a million of dollars. During the last half century our church has lost by death twenty-four of her Bishops,—McKendree, Emory; Waugh, Hedding, Soule, Roberts, Hamline, Simpson, Morris, Janes, Ames, Baker, Clark, Thompson, Kingsley, Scott, Peck, Andrew, Gilbert and E. O. Haven, Wiley, and Roberts, Burns and Benson, of Africa. Bishop Wiley and Kingsley died while visiting our missions among the heathen, where they are buried until the resurrection of the just. With profound gratitude to God, we are happy to record that from Asbury to Bishop Fowler, no cloud has ever cast a shadow upon the robe of one of our Bishops. From Mr. Wesley, our Bishops and ministers have itinerated; and this feature in our economy, perhaps, more than any other, having been sanctioned by the great head of the church in 150 years, has made our church the leading Protestant Church in Christendom. It will be admitted by all, that a stationed ministry will never bring the world to God. We must go after the people. The Methodist Church

was born in a revival of religion, and the fire has never gone out in the hearts of her ministers and people; and every day seekers may be found at her altars; and in this country she builds and pays for two churches every day in the year. Dr. Southey said while Mr. Wesley was yet living, "The Methodists die well." May this continue to be said of our people till the end of time. It is sometimes said of our church and ministers, that they have lost the power they had in the days of the fathers. The laws of association and transformation are closely allied to each other; and hence the tendency to be like other people. In this, if we have not lost, it is certain we have not gained strength. In the days of the fathers, we attended class as we do not now. And wherever our people are accustomed to attend their class meetings, you will never hear it said the church has lost her power. It is hazardous for any member of our church to fail to meet his class. In those days we had few books. Our people, old and young, read the Bible, as they do not now. We had greater zeal, and less conformity to the world. The changes, or departures, that have taken place in departing from the land marks the fathers have set us, have never improved our spirituality, as everyone will admit who has tried the dangerous experiment.

There has never been a controversy on the subject of doctrine in our church in this country or any other. All the secessions that have taken place in our Israel have been upon polity. The doctrines of our church among which we may name the total depravity of the human heart; the divinity of our Lord, Jesus Christ, who by His death, made an atonement for all mankind; the divinity and agency of the Holy Ghost; His office work in convicting men of sin, and saving them by renewing them in the image and likeness of God; the inspiration of the Holy Scriptures, and the necessity of being holy as a preparation for Heaven, have ever been prominent with us.

As we review the history of our church in the past, and believing that she was born of God, never to perish, let all within her pale thank and bless His holy name for what he has done. And, as she moves forward to bring the world to the feet of Jesus, let her people put on their strength, and her heralds blow the trumpet loud, and blow it long.

PEORIA, ILL., FRIDAY, OCTOBER 8TH, 1886.

Opening.

Conference met at 8:30 o'clock, A. M. The devotional services were conducted by J. W. Denning. At 9 o'clock, Bishop Foster opened the business of the session.

Minutes Read.

The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

Memorial to Congress on Chinese Question.

G. R. Palmer presented the following paper on the Chinese question, which, on his motion, was unanimously adopted:

To the Senate and House of Representatives in Congress assembled:

The Central Illinois Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, composed of 208 ministers, and representing 22,390 Church members, beg leave to present to your honorable body their respectful petition, showing,

1. That the treaty of 1880 between the United States and China, in which China gave her consent to the restriction of immigration of Chinese laborers to this country, provided that "Chinese laborers who are now in the United States shall be allowed to go and come of their own free will and accord, and shall be accorded all the rights, privileges, immunities, and exemptions which are accorded to the citizens and the subjects of the most favored nation." Said treaty also contained the following solemn pledge on the part of our Government: "If Chinese laborers, or Chinese of any other class, now either temporarily or permanently residing in the territory of the United States, meet with any ill-treatment at the hands of any other persons, the Government of the United States will exert all its power to devise measures for their protection, and to secure to them the same rights, privileges, immunities, and exemptions as may be enjoyed by the citizens

or subjects of the most favored nation, and to which they are entitled by treaty."

2. That most flagrant and grievous outrages have been perpetrated upon the Chinese in Wyoming and Washington Territories, and in the States of Oregon and California; and in many places in that portion of our country the purpose is still openly expressed of driving out the Chinese inhabitants.

3. That in the course of these outrages not only has much property belonging to Chinese residents been destroyed, but many persons have been put to death.

4. That the failure to keep our treaty obligations, and the inhuman persecutions and brutal massacres which have been perpetrated upon these strangers in our midst, have disgraced our country in the eyes of the civilized world, and subject us to the just judgment of a righteous God.

5. That the safety of our citizens in China is imperiled by these frequent and unredressed wrongs to Chinese subjects in the United States, and that we have no right to expect that the people of a heathen country will be more careful of the rights of American merchants and missionaries than the people of this Christian country are of the rights of the Chinese in our land.

6. That these outrages have already borne sad fruit in the destruction of the property of our mission at Chung King, in Western China, and the expulsion of our missionaries.

7. That it is imperatively necessary that immediate measures of the most stringent character be taken for the protection of the lives and property of the Chinese in this country, and the spirit of persecution and lawlessness, so rife in some regions, be sternly rebuked, and prompt and efficient punishment visited upon lawbreakers.

We therefore petition your honorable body to enact without delay such measures as will enable the officers of the law to suppress all efforts to persecute and drive out the Chinese, and secure to them, wherever they may be in our wide domain, the same protection afforded to all other persons in "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness," and especially

that the Indemnity Bill pending when Congress adjourned be passed without delay.

And for this your petitioners will ever pray.

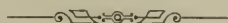

According to orders no cents appear in these columns; hence some charges will be reported fractions of dollars less than they paid. But, where the Secretary was able, he added these fractions together, and gave credit for a dollar. For example, where report said \$50.30 for missions from Churches, and \$10.70 from Sunday School, the Church will be credited with \$61.00, or the Sunday School with \$11.00, so that the total will balance. So where report read S. S. Union \$2.50, and Tracts \$2.50, it will frequently appear that one of these is reported \$3.00 and the other \$2.00, so that the charge could have all the credit possible.

REPORTS.

EDUCATION.

Your Committee submits the following report :

GARRETT BIBLICAL INSTITUTE.

We are gratified at the increased prosperity of Garrett Biblical Institute and take pleasure in recommending it to any who are preparing for the work of the ministry, and urge its claims upon all candidates for the preaching of the Word. We would also recommend that Revs. H. D. Clark and M. A. Head be appointed Conference Visitors for the ensuing year.

NORTHWESTERN UNIVERSITY.

We are prepared to report continued prosperity in the various schools of the University, and are pleased to note the increase now being made in the number of its buildings. We congratulate the Church on its possession of such an institution of learning and recommend it to any who may be seeking a thorough collegiate education. We submit the name of R. D. Russell, to be elected as trustee, by this Conference.

ILLINOIS WESLEYAN UNIVERSITY.

From the report of the Treasurer submitted to your Committee, we would report the Wesleyan University in a good financial condition, and that within the last year gifts amounting to fifteen thousand dollars have been added to the endowment fund. From the report of your visiting committee, we report thorough class work and an increase in the number of students in the college classes. Among the improvements made we have noted important additions to the museum and increased facilities for special laboratory work in the natural sciences.

We recommend the election of John Reed, of Bloomington, J. H. Wilkinson and J. H. Bunn, of Peoria, and David McWilliams, of Dwight, as trustees, and the appointment of Revs. M. P. Lackland, S. Van Pelt, J. W. Frizzelle, B. W. Baker, Jno. H. Scott and T. W. McVety as Conference Visitors.

HEDDING COLLEGE.

The trustees of Hedding College have secured a faculty in every way competent to perform the duties devolving upon them, promising thorough work in its several departments. Under the immediate instruction of Dr. J. R. Jaques, the President, the College designs to give special attention to the study of the classics without in any way detracting from thorough work in other subjects. The straitened financial condition under which the college has so long labored, has been, through the faithful efforts and self-sacrifice of Dr. J. S. Cumming, greatly improved, and the trustees now feel that by the appointment of a financial agent to apply methods already devised, this institution and its influence to the church will be assured. We recommend that J. S. Cumming, G. B. Snedaker, J. E. Williams, R. G. Pearce, Thos. Newell, G. D. Crocker, W. H. McCord, J. B. Smith, and Capt. W. Irvin be elected trustees, and that Revs. R. B. Williams, T. J. Wood, R. Crewes and G. C. Wilding be appointed as Visitors. We also recommend that Rev. D. T. Wilson, A. M., be appointed Professor and Rev. G. B. Snedaker Financial Agent in the College.

GRAND PRAIRIE SEMINARY.

The President reports a successful year in Grand Prairie Seminary, and the term just opening as promising still greater success. We recommend that Rev. E. McClish be re-appointed President and Rev. A. J. Newell Professor in the Seminary, and that Thos. Doney, Con. Haney, A. A. Waters and V. C. Randolph be appointed Visitors for the ensuing year.

Your Committee was much pleased to learn that in each of our educational institutions there is a growing spiritual interest, as manifested in their regular prayer meetings and special services held for the awakening of the unconverted.

We would impress upon the minds of our preachers the great importance of our Educational Collections, and insist that the educational idea be kept prominently before the church in the Children's Day exercises, and that no moneys thus raised shall be diverted from their proper channel. TEMPERANCE AND CONSTITUTIONAL PROHIBITION.

We, your Committee on Temperance and Constitutional Prohibition, submit the following report :

WHEREAS, 1st. The use of alcoholic beverages is a positive injury to the human race, physically, financially, socially, mentally and morally:

2d. The organized liquor traffic, tersely and appropriately termed the saloon, is a menace to civil liberty and a foe to the Republic, in that it is a corrupter of judges, a briber of juries, an intimidator of conventions, a polluter of platforms, a manipulator of campaigns, a manager of elections and a defiler of voters.

3d. Ours is a Republic of the people, by the people and for the people, in which the basal idea is—The greatest good for the greatest number:

4th. We are citizens of the Republic as well as followers of Jesus and ministers of the Gospel:

Therefore be it

Resolved, 1st. That we reaffirm our well-sustained position in favor of total abstinence from all intoxicating beverages as the only wise and safe course for the individual.

2d. That we do not consider the liquor business an honest industry, but an unmitigated and appalling national curse.

3d. That we deeply regret that our government has so fully entered into partnership with this traffic. The great government of this free Republic a mammoth saloon-keeper is a sad spectacle. As was the case with African slavery, so now is this vastly more cruel, demoralizing, debauching and ruinous slavery to strong drink entrenched and continued in existence by both National and State Legislation.

4th. That we recognize the men in the liquor business as felons in the sight of God, and the entire traffic as an outlaw against the law of the land and the law of God.

5th. That there is no remedy for this mammoth and Satanic evil but absolute prohibition, State and National, the entire abolition of the detestable and murderous traffic. We do not consider license or tax, high, low or medium, as temperance measures in any true sense of the word; and we do not propose to be deceived or deluded by them. We are fully convinced that they only tend to add respectability to the traffic, and trench it behind the cupidity of the tax payer, thus strengthening its life and lengthening its days.

6th. That the utterances of the fathers of our nation, declaring that governments should protect their subjects in their rights, particularly those rights characterized as inalienable, we hold to be unalterably true. The protection of such rights should be accurately, tersely and positively defined by Constitutional law.

7th. That we will positively, persistently but kindly press our demands until our National and State Constitutions shall be so amended as to prohibit the manufacture and sale of intoxicating beverages, thus removing from our National character the stain created by our having hitherto legalized a business which has been and is yet the greatest known foe to "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness."

8th. That we regret the tendency among politicians and political conventions and political parties to trim, temporize and evade the main issue on this momentous question, instead of meeting it squarely, as American citizens should do, on the one eternal basis of right and wrong.

9th. That we do not regret that the liquor venders have carried this burning question into politics. As the traffic has struck its heaviest blows at our political system, let it in turn receive its death-blow in the political arena. The fervid zeal of Methodist preachers in the cause of temperance has done much to prepare the public mind for the acceptance of this issue. We must not shrink from the logic of our own labor. We find

ourselves morally bound by reason of our past record to accept the challenge thus made, and meet them at the ballot box. Let us not be frightened from the post of duty by the saloon cry: "It is a political question." But let us trust in God and hunt the saloon unto the death in the pulpit and on the lecture platform.

10th. That we should assert our individual manhood in politics. Conscience should rise above party fealty. Principle is greater than platform. The man is mightier than the party. And, while we pronounce in favor of no party as such, and whatever have been our party affiliations, we will not be controlled by parties that are favorable to the liquor traffic or opposed to prohibition. God helping us, we shall vote as we pray.

11th. That we favor, heartily, the introduction into our public schools of text books portraying the evil effects of alcoholic drinks on the human system.

12th. That we deplore the assassination of that valorous leader, Rev. Geo. C. Haddock, an itinerant minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church; and, Hannibal-like, we register anew our vows of undying hatred for, and unflinching opposition to, that vicious and villainous institution, the American saloon. We feel thankful that the alleged perpetrators of this fiendish crime have been arrested, and we trust that in the interests of law and order, they will be fairly tried, and, if found guilty, adequately and justly punished.

13th. That we bid a hearty Godspeed to the Woman's Christian Temperance Union and all other real temperance organizations.

14th. We recommend the continuance of the present list of officers of the Conference Temperance Society for the coming year, viz: President, J. G. Evans; Vice President, G. J. Luckey; Secretary, G. L. Taylor; Treasurer, J. W. Haney.

15th. We recommend the appointment of Richard Haney as Conference Temperance Agent.

STATE OF THE CHURCH.

We are pleased to note a steady and healthful growth of all the material and spiritual interests of the Church during the year. The debt upon Church property has been largely reduced, new Churches and parsonages built and old ones repaired.

There has been an increase in the expenditures for attendance, interest and conversion in our Sunday Schools, and in many of our Churches.

While devoutly thankful to Almighty God for the signal blessings he has bestowed upon us, there are many things which we should deplore and which should be discountenanced. We call the attention of the Church to some of the evils which should be cured, and thereby promote the piety and power of the Church. This question is one of grave import, and we urge upon all our people *strict adherence to the letter of our book of discipline, because it does not express more than the intent of our law-makers.*

We especially deprecate the most recent American craze, *popularly known as "progressive euchre."* And all lotteries, under whatever name or guise, conducted by Church societies should be avoided, and we earnestly advise the trustees of our churches against using funds for Church purposes raised through doubtful or wrong methods by *outside* organizations. *Let the Church be clean.*

We cannot impress too strongly upon our ministers and members the growing secularization of the Sabbath, and the imperative duty of an earnest protest by precept and example against the profanation of that day.

We call attention to the fact of the wide difference between the number received on probation and the number received into full membership in the Church and ask if *greater care and better education* in the doctrines of the Church upon the part of members and pastors will not greatly lessen this evil?

We are satisfied that in the circulation of our Church papers there should be greater diligence, and that our aim should be to place a Methodist paper into each Methodist household. And especially should we insist upon every official member being a subscriber to some one of our Church papers.

It is a cause of regret that so many irresponsible evangelists are employed by pastors and Churches. We are satisfied that better and more lasting good can be accomplished by an interchange between brethren in revival meetings. In the event of employing evangelists we should see to it that they be properly authenticated or refuse to employ them.

That we recommend the faithful indoctrination of our congregations, *especially the children*, upon the obligations of the Sabbath as taught in God's word.

2d. That we recommend to our brethren that they give to this Society their earnest support by preaching on the subject of its work, and by taking collections in our Churches therefor, whenever the agents of the Society do not provide for an annual meeting.

We believe the Tract Society is worthy of the confidence and support of the Churches, as a wisely conducted agency for the supply of good and pure literature in a cheap and attractive form, offering effective aid to all the moral and benevolent work of the Church, which pastors and people ought to gladly accept. VII.

MEMOIRS.

J. S. MILLSAP.

Rev. Joseph S. Millsap was born near Salem, Washington County, Indiana, on the 29th day of December, 1828, and died near Healdsburg, California, on the 22nd day of June, 1886.

While a youth, in company with his father's family he moved to McDonough County, Illinois, and settled near Blandinsville, where he resided until grown to manhood.

We do not know the date of his conversion, but early in life he gave his heart to God, and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, unto which he was ever afterward most sincerely devoted, and in the ministry of which he spent one-third of a century, thirty-one years of which were employed in the effective itinerant ranks.

On the 27th day of November, 1856, he was united in marriage with Miss Martha J. Beeson of Canton, Illinois. To them one daughter was born, who was with her father to comfort him in his last illness, and who now tenderly shares her mother's grief.

In early manhood he was made conscious of the divine purpose to use him as a minister of the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, and right well did he make proof of his ministry.

In 1853, with a class of thirty-two, he was received on trial in the Rock River Conference. Of that class Rev. Wm. Underwood and Rev. J. S. Cumming, D. D., only remain in the effective ranks of our Conference, and Adam Hepperly sustains the Superannuated relation. By division of the Conference in 1855 he became a member of Peoria, now Central Illinois Conference, at which time he was received into full membership and ordained deacon by Bishop Janes. In 1857 he was ordained elder by Bishop Scott.

His appointments were as follows: Blandinsville, one year; Liverpool, two years; Nauvoo, one year; Brimfield, one year; Princeville, two years; Chillicothe and Rome, one year; La Prairie Center, two years; Lacon, one year, to which he was re-appointed and from which in January, 1864, he went into the army as Chaplain of the 86th regiment of Illinois Volunteers. Returning from the field in 1865 he was appointed to Lexington, where he labored for three years, and at the end of which time he was appointed presiding elder of Washington District, in which capacity he served four years. His subsequent appointments were

Normal, two years; Onarga, two years; El Paso, three years; Streator, two years; Princeville, a second time, one year; Buda, two years, at the end of which, at the Kewanee Conference in 1884, because of failing health he took the supernumerary relation, and soon after went to California in the hope that change of climate, with proper treatment would restore his health.

Heroically did he struggle against that dreadful disease, Cancer, and at one time hoped that he had conquered, and entered again upon his chosen life work as pastor of Windsor, California, but soon the relentless foe renewed his terrible work of destruction, and again the Christian warrior sheathed his sword and sat down amidst the gathering shadows of this life's border-land to wait for his summons to that land that is afar off.

Again and again that zeal which had so signally characterized his earnest ministry, arose like a tide of resistless force in his soul, and he gave expression to an unrealized hope to preach the gospel for fifteen years in California. But onward stormed his fiery charioteer until, from the summit of faith's sublimest height, God's invisible messenger caught him away from our vision, to crown him victor with them that have "overcome the world by the blood of the Lamb and the word of their testimony." In a letter of recent date, written by Sister Millsap, she records: "He talked a great deal about going home. I tried to convince him he was at home, but that did not satisfy him: then I asked him if he meant his heavenly home. He said, 'yes, I want to go.' Again she writes, 'his mind wandered so much it was seldom I could get any words of comfort from him, but we had talked so much on the subject before he got so bad, that I knew it was all right with him. So many times he said, 'Let the will of the Lord be done.'"

From the vast field of his ministry a multitude of redeemed spirits will rise up to hail him as the instrument in God's hand of their salvation.

As a man his sympathy was of the broadest type, his friendship of the tenderest and strongest character.

He rests peacefully since life's fitful dream is over. We shall not meet him again in the Church militant, but in the City of God, where "God shall wipe away all tears from our eyes," in the Church triumphant we shall join him in that song, "Unto him that hath loved us, and washed us from our sins in his own blood, and hath made us kings and priests unto God and his Father; to him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen."

Jonathan Walker Odell was born in Barnsville, Belmont Co., Ohio, Aug. 28th, 1827, and died near Marseilles, in La Salle Co., Ill., Jan. 22d, 1886, being fifty-eight years, four months and twenty-four days of age.

His early religious training was of a superior type—his father being a minister in the Methodist Episcopal Church, and his mother a devoted member of the same. At the age of twelve he was clearly converted, and

joined the church of his father's choice, under the ministerial labors of S. G. J. Worthington.

In 1853 he journeyed westward with his parents and settled in Rock Island Co., Ill., where he continued to reside until called to join the itinerant ranks. From the time of his conversion he had deep and pungent convictions to preach the gospel; but he continued to excuse himself from time to time, on the ground of needed preparation, until 1854, when, under the pastoral care of Rev. R. N. Morse, he was licensed to preach, and soon after was engaged as a Supply on a charge known as Prophetstown Circuit. In 1855 he was received as a probationer into the Rock River Conference, and was re-appointed to the Prophetstown Circuit. In 1856 he was appointed to Chicken Grove. Aug. 30th, 1857, he was ordained Deacon at Rockford by Bishop Scott, and appointed to Wheeling Circuit.

At the close of this year his impaired health made it necessary for him to discontinue the active work of the ministry, and fearing that he would not again be able to resume the "effective" relation in the ministry, he asked for a location, and settled in or near Geneseo, Ill. Change of avocation during the six succeeding years so much improved his health that he was urged to again enter the itineracy, and in 1864 he was admitted on his "Certificate of Location" to the Central Illinois Conference, and was appointed to Deanington Circuit. In 1865 he served as Pastor on the Atkinson and Annawan charge, and was returned for the second year. In 1867 he went to Wanpecan Circuit, embracing territory lying south of the Illinois River adjacent to Seneca, Ill. This charge he served successfully three successive years.

At the session of Conference held in Canton, he was ordained Elder by Bishop Thompson, Oct. 3d, 1869. He was appointed to Metamora in 1870, and to Deer Creek in 1871, which charge he served two years. In 1873 he was sent to Ottawa Circuit, covering territory now within the bounds of Grand Ridge charge. During this year his health gave way so completely that he was necessitated to ask for a change of relation, and was placed on the Superannuated list. This relation he justly sustained with great credit until his death. His life and faith were such as to command the esteem and sympathy of all who knew him.

March 8th, 1855, the year after he was licensed to preach, he was united in marriage to Miss Harriet, daughter of Rev. P. K. Hanna, one of the pioneer preachers of Western Illinois, and in the companionship of the now bereaved and stricken wife he journeyed happily for more than thirty years. The wife and three children, John F., Jane and Laura E., survive to mourn the loss of the affectionate husband and loving father.

The first great shadow which fell across the threshold of this Pastor's home was when they laid to rest their eldest daughter, who preceded her father to heaven by twenty years; but that was only a shadow, compared with the darker pall which fell upon the surviving members of this home, when the husband and father was taken from their presence.

Brother Odell was not a demonstrative man, but quietly lived and zealously labored in the vineyard of the Lord. Though not remarkably

aggressive, he had successful revivals during his active ministerial life, and made himself useful in building and improving church property.

The last three weeks of his life were weeks of superior triumph, during which he did much good by admonishing the numerous friends who called to see him to live nearer to God and be more constantly devoted to the service of Christ's Kingdom.

The members of his own family were greatly enriched by his final counsel and dying assurance that all was well. He left to them the legacy of a good and faithful life, and passed peacefully into the better land.

THOMAS HEAD.

Again we are called upon as a Conference to pause and participate in solemn services by which we are reminded that "all flesh is as grass, and all the glory of man as the flowers of grass."

On this memorial day we think of our comrades in the battle for truth and righteousness, who have fallen from the walls of our Militant Zion, crowned with victory and covered with glory, and with mingled feelings of sorrow and regret we come to pay our last tribute of respect to their memory.

To me has been assigned the duty of presenting a brief sketch of the life and labors of Rev. Thomas Head, a man called of God and commissioned to preach the gospel.

Bro. Head was born in Highland County, Ohio, on the 24th day of July, 1814, and died at Bainbridge, Ohio on the 31st day of March, 1886.

At a camp meeting to which his mother, a devout woman of God, had taken him that he might be converted, he gave his heart to God under the ministry of George W. Maley and George W. Walker, men of precious memory in the Ohio Conference, these pastors of Hillsboro Circuit, in the bounds of which he then resided, and where now his body peacefully rests.

His first great concern after his adoption into the heavenly family, was for his kinsmen according to the flesh, and in this work by his untiring zeal and fervent piety he won them all to Christ. Two members of the family became itinerant ministers and others filled important offices in the Church.

In January, 1834, he was united in marriage with Miss Margaret Foraker, who, after a companionship of fifty-two years, is now left in loneliness of widowhood to mourn with four sons and one daughter their loss of an affectionate husband and kind father.

We do not know when he became a licensed exhorter, but his first renewal was given in 1845 and bears the signature of J. M. Trimble, P. E. His license as a local preacher was issued in 1847, and bears the signature of J. F. Wright, P. E. He was ordained local deacon by Bishop Janes at Chillicothe, Ohio, in 1850, and Elder by Bishop Scott, at Cin-

cinnati, Ohio, in 1854. In 1853 he was employed to supply Highland Circuit as Junior preacher, and the following year admitted on trial to the Cincinnati Conference, and appointed to Buena Vista Circuit. His subsequent appointments were Aberdeen, West Union, Higginsport, Winchester, Aberdeen a second time, Manchester, Moscow, Batavia, Hamersville, and New Burlington. In the fall of 1869 he and his youngest son, Rev. M. A. Head, then a member of the same Conference, were transferred to the Central Illinois Conference, where for nine years he faithfully served the Church in the following appointments: Orion, Millersburg, Hennepin, Magnolia, Vermont, Macomb Circuit.

In 1878 he took the Supernumerary relation, and the following year he was granted the Superannuated relation; and returning to his former home, he supplied the Lynchburg Circuit in the Cincinnati Conference, one year, which closed his labors in the effective ministry.

Bro. Head was a good man, a Christian gentleman of the olden school, a faithful pastor and fast friend of the Church, whom a great company of redeemed souls will hail as a spiritual father.

When sickness came he endured with patience "as seeing him who is invisible," often triumphing in Christ. When he thought the end was near he calmly arranged the particulars of his interment, indicating where, by whom, and from what text his funeral should be preached, "set his house in order," and resigned all into the hands of Him who had always cared for him. Several weeks passed before the coming of the Messenger. Among his last utterances were, "I have done so little good during my life, but I rely on the mercy of Christ." "This is a pretty deliberate remove from a world of sorrows." His wife said, "You have had such a hard struggle." He answered, "Yes, but through faith in Christ, the Solid Rock." To his physician he said, "Tell your old Uncle when you see him that I'll meet him in that sun-bright clime." At another time he said, "O Savior! cover my defenseless head." "I'm standing on the bridge of life between two eternities, I have lived but a very small portion of that which is behind, but I shall live all of that which is to come. O Jesus, my Savior! Blessed Christ!"

He had such visions of glory that he expressed at times a longing to live, that he might preach again that gospel which had so sustained him in his sufferings and which now seemed so precious.

Near the close of his life he said, "tell my brethren of the Central Illinois Conference to be faithful in preaching the glorious gospel of the blessed God that so gloriously saves me." May we heed the message and be faithful to our high trust. "He rests from his labors and his works do follow him."

MARY ELLEN BOWLIN.

Mary Ellen, daughter of Jesse and Sarah Markee, and wife of Rev. M. C. Bowlin, A. M., of Central Illinois Conference, was born in Muskingum County, Ohio, Sept. 1st, 1851, and died at the home of her parents in Aledo, Ill., Oct. 27th, 1885. When she was two years old her parents came to Illinois and settled on a farm in Mercer County.

With her father's family she was converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church in a meeting held by Rev. Wm. Matheny at Sunbeam, Ill., in 1870, during which year they moved to Aledo, where they have since resided. On the 12th day of July, 1877, she was united by marriage with Rev. M. C. Bowlin. God gave them a bright, beautiful child, George Earl, now four years old.

Her conversion was clear and her Christian experience definite and positive, while her life caught up and conserved so much of the light of womanly, Christian cheerfulness as to fill her home with its radiance, while in society, as in her home, she exerted a like gracious influence. As a helpmeet to her husband in his divinely appointed work, the gospel ministry, she was as truly helpful as she was faithful. For five years she has been afflicted, and especially during the summer previous to her death she was a great sufferer. But in her long continued affliction and suffering, her wifely devotion to her husband in its full measure of sympathy with his work, his anxiety and care for all the churches "over the which the Holy Ghost hath made him overseer," and her patience in suffering, as well as in the privations rendered necessary by his official duties, were as marked as had been her constant labors ere disease had touched her with his cruel hands.

Faithfully did she perform the angelic office of mother to the son and daughters in the home of that faithful itinerant, which she entered to gladden with her happy, hopeful spirit, and who with her own darling baby boy are now left without the trusty guidance of that mother's hand.

Notwithstanding her long illness the end of life's pilgrimage was not supposed to be so near at hand. The messenger came suddenly; all were surprised. The man of swift speech whispered through the lips of the lightning to her husband over yonder in their home, whither but a few hours previous he had gone to attend to some duties, "Your wife is dying," and swift as the steam-driven chariot would bear him, he hastened to stand on the strand of the narrow sea, while in the mysterious bark, she with the pale boatman should try its passage, and to listen that he might catch some whispered word to carry with memory's treasures in the shadowy days to come, but the lips had ceased to speak, and he was just in time to stand in the deepening gloom whence her liberated spirit ascended to that world of unclouded light, to its repose in the bosom of God.

The funeral, conducted by G. J. Luckey, Dr. R. Haney, W. Wooley and G. C. Wilding, was attended by a number of other ministers and a large company of sorrowing friends, while a number of ministers unable to be present sent telegrams of condolence.

MRS. ELIZABETH W. PRYOR

was born in Leedstown, England, December 24, 1834, and came with her family to this country, when eight years old. They settled in Jo Daviess County, Illinois, where she remained until married to the Rev. T. H. Pryor, not then a minister, on September 2nd, 1857. She was converted and united with the M. E. Church in January, 1867. Sister Pryor lived a faithful and devoted Christian life, her faith was strong, her trust in Jesus perfect. In 1873 she removed with her husband to Evanston, Ill., so that Bro. Pryor might be able to obtain an education to fit him for the work of the ministry. They remained there until October, 1878. Since that time they have lived and labored in the bounds of the Central Illinois Conference, until last April, when on account of Sister Pryor's failing health, she was removed by her husband to Calliope, Iowa, where on the morning of June 1st she passed peacefully from the Church militant to the Church triumphant to be with her Lord and Savior. She was truly a helpmeet and companion to her husband in their itinerant work of eight years, and shared with fidelity and meekness the duties, joys and privations of the itinerant's life. She leaves a husband, two sons and two daughters to mourn their loss, which is her eternal gain.

First Day.

MACOMB, ILL., SEPTEMBER 28, 1887.

The Thirty-Second annual session of the Central Illinois Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church assembled in the M. E. Church, in Macomb, Illinois, at 9 o'clock A. M., Wednesday, Sept. 28th, 1887, with Bishop Cyrus D. Foss, D. D., LL. D., presiding.

The Devotional Exercises were conducted by Bishop Foss. The 798th Hymn was sung and the conference was led in prayer by the Bishop, after which he read the 23d Psalm.

Sacramental Service.—The Bishop, with the assistance of the Presiding Elders, proceeded to administer the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper to a large number of ministers and laymen.

Bishop's Address.—At the close of the Sacramental Service the Bishop addressed the Conference on the providential origin of Methodism.

Roll Call.—The Roll was called by Joseph S. Cumming, the Secretary of the last Conference, and the following named brethren (126 in all) responded. (See roll.)

Death.—When the name of J. Mathews was called, he was announced as having died during the year.

Secretaries.—On motion of R. Haney, it was decided to elect the Secretary by ballot, and the person receiving the majority of all the votes cast should be declared elected. The following persons were nominated: G. J. Luckey, F. H. Cumming, Thomas Doney and Jarvis G. Evans. I. H. Shover, D. Ayres, M. A. Head and C. Springer were appointed tellers. A ballot was then cast.

Committees.—The list of Standing Committees was then presented by the Presiding Elders and approved by the Conference. (See list of Committees.)

Conference Hours.—On motion of R. Haney it was decided to meet at 8:30 A. M., and adjourn at 11:45 A. M.

Bar.—On motion of G. J. Luckey the Bar of the Conference was fixed on a line with the rear of the fourth window.

Chartered Fund.—The Bishop informed the Conference that it was authorized to draw on the Chartered Fund for \$30.00, and on motion of W. H. Hunter, the draft was ordered and placed in the hands of the Board of Stewards.

Dividend.—The Bishop read a paper from the Book Concern announcing a dividend of \$364.00, and on motion of G. W. Gue a draft was ordered and placed in the hands of the Board of Stewards.

General Conference Entertainment.—Papers on General Conference Entertainment were referred to a Committee on that subject.

Episcopal Fund.—A communication from the Treasurer of the Episcopal Fund was read, apportioning \$1,901.00. On motion of J. G. Evans it was referred to the Presiding Elders for distribution among the Districts.

W. W. Carr.—On request of R. D. Russell, W. W. Carr was elected by the Conference, to act in his stead on the Committee on New York Book accounts.

Tellers' Report.—The Tellers reported the whole number of votes cast 111. Necessary to a choice, 56. No candidate having a majority, the Bishop announced no election. Another ballot was cast.

Special Committee.—A. K. Tullis asked the appointment of a Special Committee on the settlement of a business matter between certain parties. On request, J. W. Haney, W. H. Hunter and W. Underwood were appointed.

Missionary Anniversary.—The time of holding the Missionary Anniversary was changed from Sabbath evening to this evening for the purpose of hearing the Rev. Dr. Butler.

Conference Reporter.—On motion of J. G. Evans, W. G. Miller was appointed Conference Reporter.

Introduced.—Dr. Arthur Edwards, editor of the North-Western Christian Advocate, Dr. W. P. Stowe, of the Western Book Concern, and Rev. G. Prouty, of the Michigan Conference, were introduced.

Twentieth Question.—The 20th question, "Was the Character of each Preacher Examined?" was taken up.

J. S. Cumming, Presiding Elder of the Galesburg District, after the passage of his character, reported his District work for the past year.

Tellers' Report.—The Tellers reported the ballot for Secretary. No candidate having a majority of votes cast, the Bishop announced that there was no election. On motion of J. G. Evans it was decided to confine the balloting to the two candidates having the highest number of votes, which were Thomas Doney and F. H. Cumming. A third ballot was then cast.

Reports of Preachers.—On motion it was decided that the members of the Conference when their names are called shall report the amount of Missionary and Conference Claimants' Collections and whether all the Disciplinary Collections were taken.

Western Book Concern.—Dr. Stowe addressed the Conference in the interest of the Western Book Concern.

Tellers' Report.—The Tellers reported and the Bishop announced that Thomas Doney having received the highest number of votes was elected Secretary.

Assistant Secretaries.—The Secretary being authorized to nominate his assistants, he nominated Joe Bell and H. K. Metcalf, who were elected.

Statistical Secretary.—J. D. Calhoun was elected Statistical Secretary and authorized to nominate his own assistants.

Pastors' Reports.—By consent the Committee on Blanks passed through the audience and collected the reports.

N. W. C. Advocate.—Dr. Edwards addressed the Conference in the interest of the North Western Christian Advocate.

Passage of Character.—The following effective Elders of the Galesburg District were called, their characters passed and collections reported:

Conference Relation.—On motion it was ordered that the Committee on Conference Relations act only on such cases as the Conference may refer to it.

The Bishop appointed J. W. Haney to conduct devotional service on the following morning.

The Committees were called, announcements made and the Conference adjourned by expiration of time. The Doxology was sung, and the Benediction pronounced by Bishop Foss.

Second Day.

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 29, 1887.

The Conference assembled at 8:30 A. M., Bishop Foss in the chair.

Devotional exercises were conducted by J. W. Haney.

Journal.—The Journal of yesterday was read and, after a brief correction, approved.

Absentees.—On motion, it was decided that the Roll of absentees be called, which was immediately done by the Secretary.

Photographs.—A. K. Tullis stated that a photographer desired to get a negative of the Conference, and on motion, it was decided to adjourn at 11:30 o'clock for that purpose.

Delinquents.—On motion, the Roll of delinquents in reports was ordered called, and the following charges were reported: Galesburg District, Bushnell; Kankakee District, Goodwine.

Twentieth Question.—The 20th question was resumed. The character of C. O. McCulloch, Presiding Elder of the Kankakee District, was passed and he reported his District.

The characters of the following effective Elders were passed and collections reported: H. C. Birch, J. H. Henderson, G. I. Bailey, John Small, L. D. King, G. R. Palmer, M. V. Crumbaker, N. W. The characters of the following were passed, their collections announced, Committee of Examination re-

ported, their respective Presiding Elders represented them, and on motion, in each case, they were admitted: Arthur M. Conard, Orvis T. Dwinell, Henry B. Ward, William J. Corr, Joseph H. Hobbs, Lauchlin McLean, Amer M. Stocking.

Deacons' Orders.—Henry B. Ward, William J. Corr, Joseph H. Hobbs, Lauchlin McLean and Amer M. Stocking were elected to Deacons' Orders. Arthur M. Conard and Orvis T. Dwinell having been previously ordained Deacons.

Herman Coolidge.—On motion of M. V. B. White, Herman Coolidge, of the Canada Methodist Church, was admitted and elected to Deacons' Orders, after assenting to the Disciplinary Questions.

Recognition of Orders.—F. R. Lord, of the United Brethren Church, and Thomas M. Harris, of the Primitive Methodist Church, were recommended for admission into the Conference, and for recognition of their orders as Elders, on condition of assenting to the Disciplinary Questions. On this being done they were received and their orders recognized.

D. C. Martin, of the United Brethren Church, was recommended for admission and recognition of orders. The time having expired a motion to extend the same prevailed.

After some discussion the case of D. C. Martin was referred to a Committee consisting of G. J. Luekey, G. R. Palmer and John Rogers.

Request.—At the request of J. D. Calhoun, V. Aten was made one of the Assistant Statistical Secretaries.

General Conference Delegates.—On motion of R. Haney, the Election of Delegates to the General Conference was made the order of the day for Friday, at 9 o'clock A. M.

Hedding College.—The report of the Trustees of Hedding College was referred to the Committee on Education.

On motion of R. Haney, the name of J. G. Evans was added to the Committee on the State of the Church.

On motion, M. C. Bowlin was appointed to take the place of W. W. Carr, on the Committee on Education.

North-Western University.—On motion, the report of the Conference Trustees of the North-Western University, was referred to the Committee on Education.

The time having expired, the announcements were made and the Conference adjourned.

The Doxology was sung and the Benediction was pronounced by Bishop Foss.

Third Day.

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 30, 1887.

The Conference met at 8:30 A. M., Bishop Foss in the chair.

Devotional exercises were conducted by M. C. Bowlin.

Journal.—The Journal of yesterday was read and approved.

Order of the Day.—The Bishop stated that the time for the order of the day was so near at hand that the Conference had better prepare to take it up. He also stated that the Secretary of last year and the Secretary of this Session certified that there were 211 members in the Conference entitling it to elect five Delegates to the General Conference.

Mode of Election.—On motion of W. H. Hunter it was decided to elect the Delegates by ballot.

On motion, it was decided that all ballots containing more or less names than the number of Delegates voted for, and all blank ballots, should be thrown out.

On motion of E. S. Wilson, it was decided that those only who have a majority of all the votes cast shall be declared elected.

It was decided by motion that the Tellers should destroy all the ballots after they had been counted and recorded.

Tellers.—H. I. Brown, G. I. Bailey, R. D. Russell and J. W. Haney were appointed Tellers.

Reserve Delegates.—On motion, it was decided that two Reserve Delegates be elected, and that they should be chosen under the same rules as the Delegates.

To Count Ballots.—H. K. Metcalf, Assistant Secretary, was deputed to count and record the ballots.

A ballot was then cast, the members of the Conference standing while they voted.

Twentieth Question.—The 20th question was resumed. The character of B. W. Baker, Presiding Elder of the Streator District, was passed and he proceeded to represent his District.

The following Elders were called, their characters passed and collections reported: F. M. Hayes, T. C. Moots, H. K. Metcalf, Thomas Doney, R. B. Seaman, S. E. Steele, O. M. Dunlevy, R. B. Williams, G. C. Shaffer, F. M. Cullom, R. G. Pearce, J. W. Otterman.

On motion of B. W. Baker, the relation of J. W. Otterman was changed from effective to supernumerary.

T. W. McVety, M. P. Lackland, E. C. Wayman, E. S. Wilson, A. Bower, P. Warner, C. Springer, R. Crews, E. Wasmuth, M. C. Eignus.

On motion of B. W. Baker, M. C. Eignus was granted a supernumerary relation.

When the name of W. H. Simpson was called, his character was arrested and charges preferred by B. W. Baker, and on motion by him, the case was referred to the Presiding Elder of the Kankakee District for investigation at the earliest possible date.

On motion of B. W. Baker, a supernumerary relation was granted W. H. Simpson.

The relation of J. Wilkinson was changed from effective to supernumerary.

On motion, the relation of R. E. Buckey was changed from supernumerary to effective.

G. B. Snedaker.—By request G. B. Snedaker made a statement regarding himself, after which he was granted a supernumerary relation at his own request.

Resolution of Sympathy.—On motion of P. A. Cool, the sympathy of the Conference was extended to Bro. Snedaker in his affliction by a unanimous rising vote.

J. A. Northrup was granted leave of absence to attend a funeral.

Conference Claimants' Society.—Resolutions respecting the Conference Claimants' Society were read and adopted. (See resolutions.)

Affecting Scene.—It was announced that Franc Snedaker, the 9 year old son of Rev. G. B. Snedaker, who lost a limb in the Chatsworth

railroad disaster, was in the audience and that he had his photographs for sale. The Bishop came to the altar rail and calling the boy to him lifted him upon the table where all might see him. R. B. Seaman and J. H. Scott were requested to pass through the audience and receive subscriptions for the pictures.

D. G. Stouffer was granted a supernumerary relation.

Fourteenth Question.—The 14th question, "What Traveling Deacons have been Elected Elders?" was called. The characters of the following were passed, collections announced, Committee of Examination reported, and in each case they were elected Elders: Robert W. Ames, John H. Scott, Vincent Aten, B. F. Eckley, Leonard C. Cochran.

G. M. Webber was passed to the list of Effective Elders, having been previously ordained.

Charles W. Whorrall was passed and continued as a Traveling Deacon of the second class.

Thirteenth Question.—The 13th question, "Who are the Traveling Deacons of the Second Class?" was taken up. The characters of the following were passed, collections announced, Examination Committee reported, their respective Presiding Elders represented them, and on motion in each case they were advanced to Deacons of the second class: Alonzo A. Waters, Charles W. Cordes, George S. Reed.

Ira O. Mallory was continued with the privilege of being examined in the two years' study at the next Conference.

E. W. McMillen was announced as being transferred to the South-west Kansas Conference.

Amos J. Newell was passed and granted a supernumerary relation.

Third Question.—The 3d question, "Who Remain on Trial?" was taken up. The characters of the following named were passed, collections announced, the Committee of Examination reported, their respective Presiding Elders represented them, and on motion in each case they were advanced to the class of the second year.

E. H. Alford was passed, but had not been before the Committee of Examination.

Edward Van Petten was discontinued at his own request.

Frank H. York was discontinued.

Tellers' Report.—The Tellers reported the whole number of votes cast for Delegates to the General Conference, 142. Necessary to a choice, 72. C. O. McCulloch and P. A. Cool having received a majority of all the votes cast were declared elected. Another ballot was then cast.

Lay Electoral Conference.—G. R. Palmer and R. Haney were appointed a Committee to visit the Lay Electoral Conference.

Third Question.—The 3d question was then resumed. Asa P. Beal, John H. McMean, John L. Miller, Ransom Y. Hazzard.

W. B. Shoop was continued on trial, having been attending school.

Dr. Parkhurst, of De Pauw University was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Eighteenth Question.—The 18th question, "Who are the Supernumerary Preachers?" was taken up. The characters of the following were passed and their relation continued: O. W. Pollard, J. Tubbs, H. Ritchie, J. B. Smith, J. M. Murphy, R. A. Cowens, A. S. Atherton, M. F. Havermale, J. W. McCord, P. Smith, C. David, L. V. Webber, H. I. Brown and T. Chipperfield were passed.

J. L. Torpin and F. H. Haley were passed and granted locations at their own requests.

Tellers' Report.—The Tellers reported the second ballot for Delegates to General Conference, 145 votes. Necessary to a choice, 73. G. W. Gue having received a majority of all the votes cast was declared elected. Another ballot was then cast.

Afternoon Session.—On motion of G. R. Palmer, it was decided to hold an afternoon session for the purpose of receiving the Lay Electoral Conference, the session to begin at 4 o'clock.

G. R. Palmer and R. Haney were appointed to make arrangements to receive the Lay Conference.

On motion R. Haney was appointed to make the address to the Lay Conference.

The Eighteenth Question was resumed. H. S. Humes, N. T. Allen, A. R. Morgan, C. W. Green, T. H. Pryor, J. H. Sanders, F. M. Chaffee and C. H. St. John were passed and continued.

Dr. Jaques, President of Hedding College, was introduced.

Resolutions.—The following Resolutions of the General Conference were read and on motion made the order of the day for 9 A. M., Monday.

To the Central Illinois Annual Conference of the M. E. Church:

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHERN :—The General Conference of the Methodist Church, held in Philadelphia, Pa., May 1–28, 1884, adopted the following resolution, to-wit :

Resolved, That the Bishops be instructed to submit to the Annual Conference, for their approval or disapproval, during the year 1887, a change in Section 2 of Paragraph 71 of the Discipline, so that it shall read as follows :

SEC. 2. The General Conference shall not allow of more than one Ministerial Representative for every forty-five members of the Annual Conference, nor allow a less number than one for every ninety ; nor more than two Lay Delegates for any Annual Conference ; *provided,* nevertheless, that when there shall be in any Annual Conference a fraction of two-thirds the number which shall be fixed for the ratio of representation, such Annual Conference shall be entitled to an additional Delegate for such fraction ; and *provided,* also, that no Annual Conference shall be denied the privilege of one Ministerial and one Lay Delegate.

The Doxology was sung, the Benediction pronounced, and this pleasant, mited meeting of the Ministerial and Lay Conference adjourned.

The Conference met at 8:30 A. M., Bishop Foss in the chair.

Devotional exercises were conducted by J. G. Evans.

Collections.—R. Haney announced that a collection of \$62.52 had been taken for Bro. W. C. Cumming. A. K. Tullis reported a collection of \$30.30 taken for Miss Rowe, of India, but she refusing to accept it, the amount was turned over to the W. F. M. S. at her request.

D. C. Martin.—P. A. Cool withdrew the recommendation of D. C. Martin for admission into the Conference. The Committee in the case reported as follows: "We, the Committee appointed in the case of D. REPORTS

EDUCATION.

Your committee submits the following report :

GARRETT BIBLICAL INSTITUTE.

We are gratified at the increased prosperity of Garrett Biblical Institute, and take pleasure in urging its claims upon all candidates for the Ministry. We recommend as visitors Revs. G. W. Arnold and F. H. Cumming.

BOSTON THEOLOGICAL SCHOOL.

We are pleased to learn that the Boston Theological School continues to grow in its influence and patronage. Its past history and present efficiency warrant us in recommending it to our young men preparing for the work of the Ministry.

SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY, DEPAUW UNIVERSITY.

We have heard with great pleasure the report of Dr. Parkhurst concerning the prospects of this "School of the Prophets." We do not hesitate to recommend it, not only as among the cheapest for students, but also as among our best. We would ask the appointment of Revs. H. D. Clark and T. W. McVety as Conference visitors to this school.

NORTHWESTERN UNIVERSITY.

We are prepared to report continued prosperity in the various schools of this our University. We congratulate ourselves that we possess such an institution of learning, and cheerfully recommend it to any who may be seeking a thorough Collegiate education. We submit the name of J. W. Haney, D. D., to be elected Trustee in the University, as his own successor.

HEDDING COLLEGE.

We are happy to report that Hedding College has closed a year of marked prosperity and advancement. Among the evidences of increasing prosperity we may mention the steady increase in attendance, the

high character of the students, the constant revival influence, the ability and devotion of the faculty, the improved courses of study and methods of examinations, and the gratifying improvements in the property and appurtenances for scientific study. Although the current income has been increasing for several years, an annual deficit of nearly two thousand dollars has been a grievous burden. Temporary relief was afforded last year by the generous gifts of friends in Abingdon. We recommend that collections be taken in our various charges in the patronizing territory, to meet these deficiencies, until such time as the endowment will be sufficient to meet all expenses. We recommend that the following be elected trustees in place of those whose term of service expires in 1887: Ministers—P. A. Cool, M. V. B. White, T. J. Wood and B. F. Tallman. Laymen.—M. C. Kimball, M. C. Soule, A. B. Stickle and E. B. Hardy. To fill vacancies, we recommend G. W. Gue, Geo. C. Wilding and F. H. Cumming. We also recommend as Conference Visitors, M. A. Head, Addis Albro, C. W. Ayling and S. Van Pelt. We recommend that D. T. Wilson and T. A. Beale be appointed Professors in the College. We further recommend that the Bishop appoint a Financial Agent in the College, who shall devote all his time to its interests.

ILLINOIS WESLEYAN UNIVERSITY.

From the report submitted to your committee we find the Wesleyan University at Bloomington, Ills., in an unusually good financial condition, having an endowment of nearly \$100,000 and being practically self-supporting. The visiting committee reports a very efficient faculty in all its departments. The religious influence, in the University is unsurpassed. A biological laboratory has been added to the department of natural science, thereby rendering that department complete. We are pleased to report every department of the University in a very efficient and satisfactory condition. We recommend the following appointments: Trustees.—Hon. W. B. Harvey, Hon. W. J. Arendorff, David Smith and I. P. McDowell. Visitors.—Revs. C. O. McCulloch, R. Crewes, H. D. Clark, S. Van Pelt, B. W. Baker and J. W. Denning.

GRAND PRAIRIE SEMINARY.

Grand Prairie Seminary has had a prosperous year. While there was a falling off in the attendance in the Commercial Department, the increase in the Literary Department has made good the usual number of students. The present fall term opens up with the largest attendance for the fall term in the history of the school, except that of 1874. Opportunity is now afforded for studying phonography and type-writing. We recommend the following visitors: Revs. G. J. Luckey, Thomas Doney, J. E. Mercer, R. B. Seaman and M. V. Crumbaker.

STATE OF THE CHURCH.

With devout thankfulness to Almighty God we recognize that the past year has been fraught with great material and spiritual blessing to our beloved Methodism.

In the building and improving of Church property, and increased attendance upon the means of grace; in the growing interest of our people in the benevolent enterprises of the Church, as witnessed by their enlarged contributions, and in the unusually large number of conversions, are evidences of general prosperity within our borders.

It is gratifying to know that more attention is being given to the spiritual welfare and training of the children than in former years, and that, in the language of our presiding Bishop, we are coming to understand that "Christ meant something when he said 'Suffer the little children to come unto me.'"

In all great movements for the moral reformation and uplifting of society our church continues to take a most conspicuous part. We believe there has never been a time when the religious and moral forces of the Methodist Church were more active or potent than at the present day.

There has never been a time in our history when there was a greater demand upon us for complete consecration to the work of God than now.

The importance of abstaining from all popular amusements of a questionable character, of avoiding all practices of doubtful moral tendency at Church entertainments, and strictly adhering to the rules of our Church concerning practical Christian duties, cannot be too strongly enforced.

It is an occasion of regret that so many of our members habitually neglect the class-meeting service.

We are persuaded there is a need for, and hope there will soon come to us a revival of class-meeting attendance and power.

While we rejoice at the increasing liberality of our people toward the benevolent enterprises of the Church, yet we would urge a more general and systematic benevolence. Special booms either of churches or individuals are not healthful to the cause. Every member of our Church is under covenant obligation not only to support the Church according to his ability but also to give to its benevolent enterprises. We hold it to be the duty of Christians to at least tithe their income, and systematically apportion what they can give for Church purposes to the various claims which they have promised to sustain.

In order to aid in attaining the ideal of our Church in this matter we recommend that every charge procure a book properly ruled for a Benevolence Record, and that a permanent record of all benevolences paid by each member and friend be kept, and we call the attention of our Book Agents to the importance of preparing a Benevolence Record to meet this want of the Churches.

FREEDMEN'S AID.

"Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty," and while Chaplain McCabe's trumpet-call for "A Million for Missions" has reached every city and village and hamlet, fired the souls of our preachers, and thrilled the hearts of our people throughout the land, we need to be watchful lest our eagerness to swell the Missionary millions should detract from other departments of our Church work scarcely less important. While we are laboring to spread the fire to other lands, God in his providence is piling on more fuel at home; and while the tide of foreign immigration is pouring in upon us from every quarter of the globe, and the illiteracy and helpless degradation of nearly seven millions of Freedmen, and of a very large per cent. of the poor whites of the South, hangs like a gloomy pall over our nation, we cannot afford to slacken our zeal for the work at home.

The work of the Freedmen's Aid Society is one that God has laid upon us. He has brought it to our very doors; yea, laid it upon our hearts and consciences. It appeals to our love of God, our love of country and our love for the race. On our faithfulness and zeal in its prosecution, depend the safety and prosperity of our Christian and free institutions. As Bishop Bowman has said: "The work of this Society is more important than any other work the Church is prosecuting in America."

In view of these facts your Committee would urge upon the pastors the importance of their uniform and earnest co-operation, that the work be presented to all our people, both as Methodists and as patriotic citizens, and that collections be taken in all our congregations to aid in the evangelization and Christian education of the colored people of the South. We would also recommend that this collection be taken as early in the year as possible. Many of our failures to receive liberal contribution to our various benevolent enterprises are the results of unnecessary

delay, and the pooling of collections or the crowding them together at the end of the year.

Brethren, with gratitude to God for the victories of the past, let us look for greater and nobler achievements in the future.

TEMPERANCE AND CONSTITUTIONAL PROHIBITION.

We, your Committee on Temperance and Constitutional Prohibition, submit the following report:

WHEREAS, 1st. The use of alcoholic beverages is a positive injury to the human race, physically, financially, socially, mentally and morally:

2d. The organized liquor traffic, tersely and appropriately termed the saloon, is a menace to civil liberty and a foe to the Republic, in that it is a corrupter of judges, a briber of juries, an intimidator of conventions, a polluter of platforms, a manipulator of campaigns, a manager of elections and a defiler of voters.

3d. Ours is a Republic of the people, by the people and for the people, in which the basal idea is—The greatest good for the greatest number:

4th. We are citizens of the Republic as well as followers of Jesus and ministers of the Gospel:

Therefore be it

Resolved 1st. That we reaffirm our well-sustained position in favor of total abstinence from all intoxicating beverages as the only wise and safe course for the individual.

2d. That we do not consider the liquor business an honest industry, but an unmitigated and appalling national curse.

3d. That we deeply regret that our government has so fully entered into partnership with this traffic. The great government of this free Republic a mammoth saloon-keeper is a sad spectacle. As was the case with African slavery, so now is this vastly more cruel, demoralizing, debauching and ruinous slavery to strong drink entrenched and continued in existence by both National and State Legislation.

4th. That we recognize the men in the liquor business as felons in the sight of God, and the entire traffic as an outlaw against the law of the land and the law of God.

5th. That there is no remedy for this mammoth and Satanic evil but absolute prohibition, State and National, the entire abolition of the detestable and murderous traffic. We do not consider license or tax, high, low or medium, as temperance measures in any true sense of the word; and we do not propose to be deceived or deluded by them. We are fully convinced that they only tend to add respectability to the traffic, and entrench it behind the cupidity of the tax payer, thus strengthening its life and lengthening its days.

6th. That the utterances of the fathers of our nation, declaring that governments should protect their subjects in their rights, particularly those rights characterized as inalienable, we hold to be unalterably true. The protection of such rights should be accurately, tersely and positively defined by Constitutional law.

7th. That we will positively, persistently but kindly press our demands until our National and State Constitutions shall be so amended as to prohibit the manufacture and sale of intoxicating beverages, thus removing from our National character the stain created by our having hitherto legalized a business which has been and is yet the greatest known foe to "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness."

8th. That we regret the tendency among politicians and political conventions and political parties to trim, temporize and evade the main issue on this momentous question, instead of meeting it squarely, as American citizens should do, on the one eternal basis of right and wrong.

9th. That we do not regret that the liquor venders have carried this burning question into politics. As the traffic has struck its heaviest blows at our political system, let it in turn receive its death-blow in the political arena. The fervid zeal of Methodist preachers in the cause of temperance has done much to prepare the public mind for the acceptance of this issue. We must not shrink from the logic of our own labor. We find ourselves morally bound by reason of our past record to accept the challenge thus made, and meet them at the ballot box. Let us not be frightened from the post of duty by the saloon cry: "It is a political question." But let us trust in God and hunt the saloon unto the death in the pulpit and on the lecture platform.

10th. That we should assert our individual manhood in politics. Conscience should rise above party fealty. Principle is greater than platform. The man is mightier than the party. And, while we pronounce in favor of no party as such, and whatever have been our party affiliations, we will not be controlled by parties that are favorable to the liquor traffic or opposed to prohibition. God helping us, we shall vote as we pray.

11th. That we favor, heartily, the introduction into our public schools of text books portraying the evil effects of alcoholic drinks on the human system.

12th. That we rejoice in the determination of the prosecution to bring to justice the murderers of the Rev. Geo. C. Haddock, an itinerant minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church. We feel thankful that one of the perpetrators of this fiendish crime has been proven guilty, and we find encouragement in the thought that other parties associated with him will, in the near future, in the interests of law and order, receive just punishment.

13th. That we bid a hearty Godspeed to the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, and all other real temperance organizations, and that we recognize the white cross movement of great importance as a branch of Christian effort for the social purity of the young and give to the Woman's Christian Temperance Union our hearty indorsement in this new line of their work.

14th. We recommend the appointment of Richard Haney as Conference Temperance Agent.

But, where the Secretary was able, he added these fractions together, and gave credit for a dollar. For example, where report said \$50.30 for missions from Churches, and \$10.70 from Sunday School, the Church will be credited with \$61.00, or the Sunday School with \$11.00, so that the total will balance. So where report read S. S. Union \$2.50, and Tracts \$2.50, it will frequently appear that one of these is reported \$3.00 and the other \$2.00, so that the charge could have all the credit possible.

MEMOIRS

REV. JACOB MATHEWS, M. D.

Jacob Mathews was born in Baltimore, Md., February 23d, 1819.

The family moved to Dayton, Ohio, in 1824, and here he grew to manhood, studied medicine, and served one term as County Treasurer. He was converted and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church at Mackinaw, Illinois, in 1839.

On April 8th, 1840, he was married to Esther J. Whitman, who has been a worthy companion in all his work as physician and pastor during the forty-seven years of their married life.

August 20th, 1842, Rev. James B. Finley, Presiding Elder of the Dayton District, licensed him to preach. In 1847, at Columbus, Ohio, he was ordained Deacon by Bishop Janes. In 1853 he moved to Mackinaw, Illinois, where he successfully practiced medicine until 1854, when he was ordained Elder by Bishop Morris, and admitted on trial into the Rock River Conference, and appointed to Magnolia circuit.

He served the following charges in the Rock River and Central Illinois Conferences: 1855, Avoca; 1856, Ottawa; 1857-8, Whitefield; 1859, Toulon and La Fayette; 1860-1, Wyoming; 1862-4, Victoria; 1865-6, Whitefield; 1867, Henry; 1868-9, Berwick; 1870-1, Pleasant Mound; 1872-3, Bardolph; 1874-5, Victoria; 1876-7, La Fayette; 1878, Bradford. In 1879, because of infirmities, he was granted a superannuated relation, and moved to Nebraska, and in 1880 came to Union, Hardin County, Iowa, where he resided until death. He was an able minister, argumentative, logical and instructive. He had a good memory and was a fluent speaker.

Dr. Mathews suffered greatly for nearly three years, but in his greatest sufferings his trust was unshaken in the Redeemer, and he always spoke joyfully of the time when it should be said, "It is enough, come up higher."

He died in Union, Iowa, May 8th, 1887, in hope of a glorious immortality. He kept a diary, and just before his death he wrote these words:

"The head-land of Glory I see,
By faith, I see it afar;
There, Angels are waiting for me,
My happiness nothing shall mar."

Five sons awaited his coming on the ever-blessed shore. The faithful wife, two sons, and three daughters linger in hope of a blessed reunion beyond the grave.

We, his companions in holy toil will pray for the blessing of God upon the family, and especially for the bereaved wife, who, in feeble health, is left to tread the lonely path of sorrow.

Dr. Mathews was greatly loved by those who knew him. In a letter to one of the members of the Conference, written a few weeks before he died, he says, "I love the Central Illinois Conference, God bless the brethren."

It was Sabbath morning in beautiful May that sitting in his chair he "fell asleep," and his wife said to him, "Father, don't you want your breakfast?" As he did not open his eyes, she instantly saw that his spirit had gone up to God. "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints."

WILLIAM LOGAN HARRIS, D. D., LL.D.

Bishop William L. Harris, was born near Mansfield, Richland County, Ohio, Nov. 14th, 1817. In his childhood and early youth he had only the very limited advantages of the log school house near his country home. He possessed a large and strong physical manhood, an iron constitution, an almost irresistible will power and indomitable energy. He was converted at a camp-meeting under the ministry of Rev. H. O. Sheldon, June 10th, 1834. As the result of his conversion he received an inspiration for knowledge, and a laudable ambition for an education that he might be fitted for greater usefulness. He was the second student enrolled in Norwalk Seminary, the first institution west of the Ohio river, owned and controlled by the Methodist Episcopal Church. He was licensed to preach in 1836, and employed one year by the Presiding Elder on Wellington Circuit. On Sept. 7th, 1837, he was admitted on trial in the Michigan Conference, which at that time embraced the northern part of Ohio, and was successively appointed to Dover and Worcester Circuits and to Mansfield. In 1840, the North Ohio Conference having been formed, he became a member of it, and was appointed to Belleville, Amity, Chesterville, and in 1844 to Delaware. In 1845 he accepted a tutorship in the Ohio Wesleyan University, but in 1846 returned to the pastorate and was appointed to Toledo. In 1847 he was sent to Norwalk and in 1848, at the special request of his Conference, he consented to take charge of Baldwin Institute, now Baldwin University. In 1851 he took charge of the Academical department of the Ohio Wesleyan University, and in 1852 he was elected to the chair of Chemistry and Natural History in that institution, which he filled with great acceptability for eight years. In 1860 he was elected by the General Conference as Assistant Corresponding Secretary of the Missionary Society, to which position he was twice re-elected, holding the office until 1872, when he was elected Bishop. In this office he traveled extensively in the United States and also circumnavigated the globe, visiting our

missions in Japan, China, India, Turkey, Italy, Switzerland, Germany and Scandinavia. He was a member of the General Conference in 1856, 1860, 1864, 1868 and 1872, and was secretary of that body in all those sessions, having been re-elected each time without opposition. In 1874 he was sent as a Delegate to the British Wesleyan Conference. He received the degree of Doctor of Divinity from Alleghany College in 1856, and that of Doctor of Laws from Baldwin University in 1870.

Bishop Harris was a man of great powers of endurance and wonderful energy. His plainness of speech together with his great earnestness was often misunderstood, and attributed to a want of sympathy and kindness. He was a thorough disciplinarian and not disposed to allow any apologies for looseness in Church business and work, but he was a great-hearted man who had to be known to be appreciated. Personal association with him removed all prejudice which might have arisen from his apparent want of sympathy while discharging the duties of his official positions.

He had a legal mind. His knowledge of law and parliamentary usage eminently fitted him to preside over deliberative bodies. He was remarkably prompt and accurate, and always firmly stood by his convictions. In the days of the anti-slavery agitation, he stood among the foremost as an advocate of abolition sentiment. He was a man of great heart, great mind and great activity. About the first of August, Bishop Harris was taken ill with heart trouble, in Liverpool, England. He sailed immediately for New York. Arriving at home he placed himself under the best medical care, but human skill failed, and on Sept. 2d, at 5 o'clock P. M., he rested from his labors and entered upon his reward. The workmen fall but the work goes on.

ELLEN DAVIS HILL.

Ellen Davis, wife of D. M. Hill, was born in Montreal, Canada, September 18th, 1830, and when quite young came with her parents to Niagara Falls, New York, where they resided till 1844, when they came to Kendall County, Illinois, where she engaged in teaching school, which vocation she followed for more than ten years.

She was united in marriage to her now bereaved husband July 4th, 1856, and for nearly 31 years shared with him the toils and sacrifices of the itinerancy.

She was converted and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church in her sixteenth year, and continued a faithful member until called to the Church Triumphant. In 1870, at Oak Hill Camp-meeting, she experienced the blessing of entire sanctification.

Her home was always opened to welcome the itinerant and many will remember how cheerfully she ministered to their comfort.

She was active in all church work, especially in the Sabbath School, always having a large class under her care.

Her husband was assigned to Toulon in 1864 which appointment he filled for two years, and so strong was her attachment for her Toulon friends that she made a request of her family that when she died she might be buried at that place.

In December of 1884 she had a severe paralytic stroke from which she never recovered, though sometimes she was able to attend the house of God.

She had remarked to her family, that should it please the Lord, she would like to die just as the sun was setting, and God granted her request, for at six o'clock on the evening of February 21st, she suddenly passed to her heavenly home.

She leaves a husband, two daughters and three brothers to mourn their loss.

She was one of a family of eight children, five of whom with the parents, sleep in graves scattered from Niagara Falls to Kansas, and from Northern Illinois to Southern Georgia.

How appropriate then is the language of the poet.

"Asleep in Jesus, far from thee,
Thy kindred and their graves may be;
But thine is still a blessed sleep,
From which none ever wake to weep."

MRS. FANNY MOREY.

Mrs. Fanny Morey, wife of Rev. John Morey, a superannuated member of the Central Illinois Conference, was born in Oneida County, New York, July 26th, 1804. She was converted and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church when fifteen years of age, and for sixty-seven years adorned her profession by a sincere Christian life.

On the 19th day of August, 1821, she was married to John Morey. In 1831 they moved to Hudson County, Ohio, where her husband entered the itinerancy in 1834. In 1839 they moved to Illinois, where she, for thirty years, shared the toils, trials and rewards of the Methodist Ministry in the new and rapidly growing State. After her husband's superannuation in 1869, they moved to Gilroy, Cal., where they resided until two years ago, when they removed to San Jose, Cal., to spend their remaining days with their daughter, Mrs. Clark, where she died January 21, 1887.

She was a woman of a very beautiful character. She loved the house of God, and to the last, when it was possible, she occupied her place in the sanctuary. During the many years spent in the regular work in Illinois, her husband, on large circuits, or still larger districts, was much of the time absent from home, and she had the care of the family. But in the midst of anxiety and toil, she patiently and joyfully "endured as seeing Him who is invisible." As pastor's wife, she was once a resident of Macomb, and wherever she lived her name "is as ointment poured forth."

During the last two years of her life she was a great sufferer, but her faith was steadfast and immovable until death brought release and rest. She leaves to her husband, children and grand-children, a rich legacy of faith and good works. She has passed away from "the land of the dying" to "the land of the living," where so many of God's heroic ministers, and so many patient, cross-bearing, sweet-spirited wives of ministers are gathered "to sing God's praise in endless day."

The physical condition of Father Morey is such that it cannot be long until the old veteran shall be greeted by his faithful wife on the heavenly shore.

HARRIET MIRIAM NORTHRUP.

Harriet Miriam, daughter of the late Rev. Leander S. and Miriam L. Walker, and wife of Rev. James A. Northrup, was born at Round Prairie, Boone County, Illinois, on the 31st day of May, 1849.

Her father was a Minister in the Methodist Episcopal Church for fifty years, a member of the Rock River Conference from its organization to the date of his death, the 13th day of Dec. 1884.

She could not tell when she was converted, and those who knew her all her life say she seemed to be always a child of God. In early youth she united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, of which she continued a consistent member, and to which, with Christian cheerfulness she consecrated her whole life.

She was united by marriage with Rev. James A. Northrup, then a member of Rock River Conference, on the 29th day of Dec. 1875.

When her husband was moved by the Holy Spirit to offer himself for mission work in India, without personal convictions of duty in that field, she said, "I am ready to go wherever the Lord of the vineyard calls my husband to labor," and with that sublime spirit of wifely devotion and Christian consecration, she bade her aged father, her invalid mother, and her loving and beloved brothers and sisters good bye, and, leaving all that was dear to her in her native land, on the 20th day of Oct., 1877, with her husband she sailed for "the Land of the Sun," where in that strange and trying clime she was to enter upon faithful service for the Master. For seven and a half years, in Calcutta, Poona, Bombay and Bangalore she labored faithfully and successfully, the latter half of which with failing health.

Finally, with her health broken as well as that of her husband, to them nothing remained to be done but to return to the home-land or await the rest of the grave. They reached their home in Rock Island, Ill., on the 10th day of June, 1885. But how changed! The dear, honored

parents had gone to join the Church Triumphant, and their welcome home could not be given until she should cross the mystic sea. Strange and glad was the welcome home by the brothers and sisters, for it was well nigh like receiving one back who had gone to come not again.

Soon after the Conference session of 1885, Bro. Northrup became Pastor of Hampton charge, where her Christian womanly spirit won her many friends.

On Monday, Oct. 11th, 1886, while her husband was in attendance upon the session of the Conference in Peoria, Ill., she was taken seriously ill. A dispatch was sent to him, but was delayed and he was unable to reach home until Tuesday night. She bore up bravely until 3 p. m., but when he failed to reach home on the train due at that hour, she sank rapidly and died an hour and a half later.

Bishop Foster, Rev. Dr. Thoburn, Rev. George Brown, of Bombay, and many others in India and America testify to her sterling worth and Christian usefulness.

In all the relations she sustained, she entertained a very modest estimate of her work; but, in every field to which her husband was assigned, she exerted the gracious influence of earnest Christian cheerfulness upon society, and so enforced his Christian teachings, and her memory is enshrined in loving hearts that were helped by her truly Christ-like life.

Rev. Fawcett Shaw wrote from Alundabad, India, the following tribute: "No Minister's wife, in or out of the South India Conference, proved herself so truly a friend in every sense of the word. Her memory will ever be precious to both my wife and myself. How often did she come in as an angel of light, when my poor wife was ailing and low spirited in Bangalore. How many hours did she spend working and talking to my wife during those days, bringing sunshine with her. How grateful I have felt for this kindness I cannot tell; but no one knows better than I do, except perhaps, Mrs. Shaw, how much those visits did. I remember returning home from office earlier than usual one day expecting to find my wife low, but there she sat working, and Sister Northrup sat next to her with her work basket and cheerful manner. I recognized in her the cause of my wife's restored spirit, and I thanked God for such a friend." To the record of her consistent Christian life she added unequivocal testimony of the clearness of her conscious acceptance with God.

The prayers of many in India as well as America will ascend for the bereaved husband, the three motherless children, and the circle of brothers and sisters, now for the first time broken, that they shall know the Lord "healeth the broken in heart, and bindeth up their wounds."

MRS. ELIZABETH M. SNEDAKER.

Sister Elizabeth M. Snedaker, wife of Rev. G. B. Snedaker, and daughter of Joel and Louisa S. Ausley, was born in Jerusalem, Yates County, N. Y., Jan. 30th, 1839, and was instantly killed by the wrecking of the Niagara Falls excursion train on the Toledo, Peoria & Western road, between Chatsworth and Piper City, near midnight of Aug. 10th, 1887, aged 48 years, 6 months and 10 days. She was converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church in early life, was familiar with the doctrines and usages thereof, and loyal to the same. Her early life was spent in her native State, where she obtained her education—first in the district school, then at Penn Yan Academy, finishing at Genesee Wesleyan Seminary, Lima, N. Y. Teaching was her favorite calling, and she spared no pains in preparation for her work and withheld no energy that was necessary to success. She taught for a number of years in her native State, then came to Illinois and taught until united in marriage with our bereaved Brother Snedaker. She stood firm and strong by her husband's side, sharing his burdens and rejoicing in his victories for over twenty years of itinerant life. She was a most successful helper in revival work, seeming to be equally at home leading the song service, looking up the penitent, pointing them to Christ, or pleading at the Throne of grace in their behalf. Many will rejoice in eternity that they met her while on their way. Sister Snedaker was the mother of three children. The eldest died in childhood; the second, a daughter, is attending Hedding College, and the third, Franc Willing, in his ninth year, was with his mother on the ill-fated train, and was maimed for life, and, in what seems to be almost a miraculous manner, escaped death.

During the latter part of her life her religious experience was greatly intensified. Her consecration to God and to His service was thorough. Her acceptance of Christ was in full assurance of faith, and clearly did the Holy Ghost testify to her spirit of the same. All difficulties and trials were taken to the Lord in prayer, and seldom did she leave the place of communing with God without light, peace or joy, and sometimes all combined. Her husband and family bear testimony of seasons of wonderful victory and blessings in her private home-life and experience. She richly enjoyed, and, in an humble manner and with a sweet spirit, testified of the blessing of sanctification. On the Sabbath before her death, in general class, she bore clear and joyful testimony of the completeness of this great salvation.

The last time that she attended the Tuesday evening meeting, which is held for the promotion of holiness, the leader, Brother Duffield, bears this testimony: "I was urging upon those present the necessity of a

deep religious experience; that they ought to be always ready to do God's will—to live or to die if it was his will to call them. I then asked the question, 'Are we all thus ready to go?' Sister Snedaker rose and said, 'Yes, Brother Duffield, I feel that I *am* ready. If the Lord should take me this moment I feel that I am ready to go, for the blood of Christ cleanseth me from all sin. I am so glad that I was led into this experience of perfect love; it keeps me so sweetly amid all the trials of life. I want to ever live at the feet of Jesus.'" About this time she wrote to a sister in New York and added this word of testimony: "Living or dying, I am the Lord's." That Wednesday morning, as the family sat at the breakfast table together for the last time, Bro. Snedaker remarked, "We separate this time under very peculiar circumstances; we do not seem to know just what is before us in the future." This he said because of the indefinite length of his wife's visit to her mother's sick-room, and his own correspondence with reference to a field of labor in the far West. She answered, "Yes, I had thought of that, but we will trust in the Lord and it will all come out right." With such feelings of faith and assurance she started with little Franc to visit for the last time her mother, now 79 years of age and afflicted with disease liable to prove fatal at any time. She took the Niagara excursion train because money was scarce, owing to the financial peculiarities of her husband's last appointment. Some of her neighbors and friends being in company with her, all went pleasantly until the midnight hour, when, without warning, there was a shock—a crash—a wreck; and in a moment's time—almost "in the twinkling of an eye," all was changed with her from mortal to immortality. The manner in which death came to her was such that she could not have suffered pain as we mortals understand consciousness. It was instantaneous death. Franc's plaintive cry of "mamma," during that hour and a half of awful imprisonment was unanswered, because the one stood on the banks of the River of Death, the other on the banks of the River of Life.

MRS. ELIZA A. H. UNDERWOOD.

Eliza Anne Hewitt Underwood, the wife of Rev. Wm. Underwood, of the Central Illinois Conference, was born in McDonough County, Ill., on the 27th day of Aug. 1837, and died May 14th, 1887, aged 49 years, 6 months and 17 days.

Her parents were from Maine, and settled in Warren County, this State, in 1837. During a temporary stay in McDonough County Eliza

Anne was born. Her parents were both members of the Free-Will Baptist Church. Her father was a U. S. soldier in the war of 1812. He was murdered for his money in the city of Peoria, near where Hale Chapel now stands, in 1850. His memory is still cherished as an earnest Christian. Her mother is still living at the age of 87. At the age of 16 Mrs. Underwood was converted and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church and continued a member of it until she was transferred to the Church Triumphant in Heaven.

She was married to her now bereaved husband, Sept. 1st, 1858. To them were born five children; one, the oldest, is now preaching the gospel in Dakota and another is "singing the gospel" in successful evangelistic work. She was ambitious to be a true wife and mother—here she found scope for the exercise of her highest powers. As a wife she was as pure and noble as she could be; as a mother she was patient, indulgent, kind, yet never tolerating in her children anything she conceived to be wrong. It was a great comfort to her that her children are Christians and engaged in religious work.

She was a woman of prayer and strong faith. In times of special trial she would say to her husband, "I have been praying and we shall come out all right," and in turn when he would become discouraged, she would say, "Don't give up, put your trust in God; we do not trust Him as we ought." During the night before her death she said, "I do not expect to get well." She then spoke to each of the family present, urging them to meet her in Heaven. The oldest son not being present, she left for him this counsel, "Continue to be a good man, and do all the good in your power." She also said, "how thankful we ought to be when we consider the good providence which has placed us here at this time among friends who have done for us all they could." When she was informed that her children, absent, were coming home, she said, "Praise God; I want to live just long enough to see them." She died at 7:30 in the evening.

"Asleep in Jesus, blessed sleep,
From which none ever wake to weep."

MACOMB, ILL., FRIDAY, SEPT. 30, 1887.

The Lay Electoral Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church met in the Baptist Church at Macomb, Ill., at 10 o'clock A. M., and organized by electing Hon. W. C. Galoway, President, and G. W. Butters, Secretary. A. Atwood and R. G. Risser were elected Assistant Secretaries.

The Conference was led in prayer by Henry Augustine.

Committee on Credentials.—On motion, Howard Wells, M. C. Soule and Amos F. Leigh were appointed a Committee on Credentials.

After some discussion the Committee on Credentials was instructed to report immediately.

Annual Conference.—Rev. R. Haney and Rev. G. R. Palmer came as a Committee from the Annual Conference to request that the Lay Conference visit the Annual Conference at some time during the day.

C. W. Boydston, J. H. Bunn and W. J. Orendorf were sent as a Committee to the Annual Conference to say that the Lay Conference would visit them at 4 o'clock P. M.

Resolutions.—On motion, Robt. Bennett, John J. Haverman, Isaac Bailey and J. M. Snedaker were appointed a Committee on Resolutions.

Adjourned.—On motion, the Conference adjourned to meet at 1:30 o'clock P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Conference convened at 1:30 p. m., and was led in prayer by Rev. John D. Smith.

The Committee on Resolutions reported the following, which were read and adopted :

Resolved, That we condemn the sale and use of intoxicating liquors as a beverage, and will, by every means in our power, as law-loving and God-fearing Christians and Church representatives, strive to drive from our midst the unholy and soul destroying traffic.

WHEREAS, The Sabbath has been appointed, set apart and sanctified by God as a day of sacred and holy rest, and

WHEREAS, Its sanctity is openly violated by various insidious forms of desecration; therefore,

Resolved, That we heartily unite in censuring the great evil of social visitations on the Sabbath, and that special attention be given by our Church to aid in every possible way to suppress the great sin of Sabbath desecration.

WHEREAS, The class meeting has been a profitable and blessed means of grace to our people in times past, and

WHEREAS, We find the interest in this important part of our worship declining; therefore,

Resolved, That we, the members of this Lay Conference, do hereby pledge ourselves to encourage and sustain this divinely appointed means of grace.

WHEREAS, The use of Tobacco is one of the most prominent evils of our nation, and its use inconsistent with the demands and wants of our nature; therefore,

Resolved, That we will, to the extent of our ability, discourage its use by precept and example.

Balloting.—On motion, the Conference proceeded to ballot for two Delegates to the General Conference. After two ballots, neither of which resulted in an election, the hour of 4 o'clock having arrived, the Conference visited the Annual Conference.

Interesting remarks were made by R. Haney, Hon. W. C. Galway and Bishop Foss.

Business was resumed in the Baptist Church.

The Conference again proceeded to ballot, which resulted in the election of Isaac Bailey, of Gilman, and J. H. Bunn, of Peoria, as Delegates to the General Conference.

Reserve Delegates.—W. B. Rickey and M. C. Soule were elected as Reserve Delegates.

Resolutions.—The following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That we tender our thanks to the citizens of Macomb for the kind manner in which they have entertained the members of this body; also, to the members of the Baptist Church for the use of their Church building for the Lay Conference; also, to the President and Secretary for their services.

The Doxology was sung, and the Benediction pronounced by Rev. G. W. Peregoy.

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First Day.

KANKAKEE, ILL., SEPTEMBER 19, 1888.

The Thirty-Third annual session of the Central Illinois Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church convened in Grace M. E. Church, Kankakee, Illinois, at 8:30 A. M., Wednesday, September 19th, 1888, Bishop J. M. Walden, D. D., presiding.

The Devotional Exercises were conducted by Bishop Walden. The session was opened by singing the Doxology, followed with prayer by L. B. Dennis. The Bishop then read the 2nd Chapter of Isaiah, and the 1st Chapter of II. Peter. The 160th Hymn was sung. The Bishop announced the receipt of a telegram bearing the news of the death of a daughter of M. V. B. White. Prayer was offered by E. Wasmuth.

Sacramental Service.—After singing the 508th Hymn, Bishop Walden, assisted by the Pastor of this church and the Presiding Elders, administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper to a large number of ministers and laymen. Then was sung the 211th Hymn.

Expression of Sympathy.—At the suggestion of the Bishop, and on motion of C. O. McCulloch, A. K. Tullis was appointed to bear the sympathy of the Conference to Bro. M. V. B. White, and to accompany him to his home to attend the funeral of his daughter.

Roll Call.—The Roll was called by T. Doney, Secretary of the last Conference, and the following members (123 in all) responded to their names. (See roll.)

Secretaries.—B. W. Baker nominated T. Doney for election as Secretary which was done by acclamation. J. D. Calhoun was nominated by P. A. Cool for Statistical Secretary and was unanimously elected.

Treasurer.—E. Wasmuth was elected Conference Treasurer.

Introduced.—J. W. Mendenhall, D. D. Editor of the *Methodist Review*, was introduced, and addressed the Conference in the interest of the *Review*. John Nate of the Rock River Conference was introduced.

Committees.—P. A. Cool, for the Presiding Elders presented the list of Standing Committees, which was approved by the Conference. (See list of Committees.)

Conference Reporter.—On motion of J. W. Haney, F. H. Cumming was appointed Conference Reporter.

Railroad Secretary.—On motion of J. S. Cumming it was ordered that the pastor of the church where the next Conference session is held shall be the Railroad Secretary.

Question of Privilege.—J. S. Cumming spoke to a question of privilege in which he explained his action in regard to the Conference trunk.

Conference Hours.—The time of meeting at 8:30 A. M., and of adjourning at 12 M., was agreed upon.

Bar.—The bar of the Conference was fixed on a line with the rear of the third window.

Assistant Secretaries.—On nomination by the Secretary, Joe Bell and H. K. Metcalf were elected as his assistants. On nomination of J. D. Calhoun, J. F. Robinson, J. A. Riason, Vincent Aten, D. S. McCown, and J. E. Mercer, were elected Assistant Statistical Secretaries.

Reports.—Five minutes were allowed the Committee on Blanks to collect the Reports.

Introduced.—C. L. Davenport was introduced and announced as being transferred to this Conference.

Twentieth Question.—The 20th question, "Was the character of each Preacher examined?" was taken up.

The name of A. R. Jones was called, and on motion of P. A. Cool, a committee of inquiry was appointed on his case. The name of E. C. Wayman was called, and on motion of B. W. Baker a committee was appointed to inquire into his case. (See lists.)

C. O. McCulloch reported the investigation in the case of W. H. Simpson Jr., which was referred to him at the last Conference, that he

was found guilty and suspended. On motion of R. B. Williams, a select Number of fifteen was appointed to try the case. (See list.) G. J. Luckey was appointed to preside at the trial, H. K. Metcalf was appointed Secretary, J. G. Evans was appointed to represent the Church, and E. S. Wilson, the accused.

The papers in the case of A. R. Jones were passed by P. A. Cool to the hands of R. G. Pearce, chairman of the committee.

Chartered Fund.—The Bishop announced that the Conference was authorized to draw on the Charter Fund for \$30.00, and a draft to that amount was ordered and placed in the hands of the Board of Stewards.

Book Concern Dividend.—The Bishop also announced that a dividend of \$495.00 was subject to the order of the Conference. On motion it was ordered that a draft for that amount be made and placed in the hands of the Board of Stewards.

Introduced.—Dr. A. B. Leonard, one of the Corresponding Secretaries of the Missionary Society, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

The time was extended.

Gospel in All Lands.—W. H. Witter was appointed to take subscriptions for "The Gospel in All Lands."

The papers in the case of W. H. Simpson Jr., were placed in the hands of G. J. Luckey, chairman of the Select Number.

Apportionment.—On motion of G. R. Palmer it was voted that the apportionment of the Benevolences be left with the Presiding Elders.

Conference Relations.—The Bishop announced that the list of the Superannuated and Supernumerary Preachers should go before the Committee on Conference Relations.

Assistant Treasurers.—E. Wasmuth, Conference Treasurer, nominated the following assistants, who were elected: Missions: G. B. Snedaker; Church Extension: A. K. Tallis; Education: R. Crewes; Freedman's Aid: T. J. Wood; Episcopal Fund: F. W. Merrell; Sunday School Union and Tract Society: A. Smith.

The committees were called, the announcements were made and on motion the Conference adjourned. The Doxology was sung and W. H. Hunter pronounced the Benediction.

Second Day.

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 20, 1888.

The Conference assembled at 8:30 a. m., Bishop Walden in the chair.

The devotional services were conducted by R. B. Williams.

Journal.—The Journal of the previous day was read, corrected and approved.

Introduced.—Dr. Edwards, Editor of the North Western Christian Advocate, Dr. Stowe, Agent Western Book Concern, J. N. Van Evary, of North Dakota Conference, E. G. Smith, Agent American Bible Society, G. R. Copeland, recently transferred from the W. Va. Conference, R. H. McDade, transferred from the Iowa Conference, and J. G. Dee, of the Southern Illinois Conference, were introduced.

Transferred.—The Bishop announced the transfer to this Conference of G. R. Wolff, from the Austin Conference.

Absentees.—The Secretary called the roll of absentees, and the following sixteen answered to their names. (See roll.)

Calling Roll.—On motion of R. Haney it was decided to dispense with further calling of the roll.

Various papers concerning Supernumerary and Superaunated Preachers were passed to the Committee on Conference Relations.

Transferred.—W. H. Hunter announced that he had received the transfer of James Ferguson from the West Nebraska Conference, and passed it to the Bishop, and his name was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.

Reconsideration.—On motion of J. W. Haney the Conference reconsidered the motion fixing the time of opening and adjourning the sessions. He then moved as an amendment, that the hour of adjournment be 11:45 a. m., instead of 12:00 m. The motion prevailed.

Resolutions.—A preamble and resolution concerning the restoration of the Kewanee District was presented by W. H. Hunter (see resolutions). He also handed the Bishop a petition concerning the same.

R. Haney moved that when we adjourn it shall be to meet at 2:00 p. m. to-day, to consider the above-named resolution. J. S. Cumming moved to amend by inserting the word "tomorrow" for "to-day." It was suggested by the Bishop if the time of meeting was set at 4:00 p. m. he could be present. The amendment and suggestion were accepted, and the motion as amended prevailed.

Jaques, an Elder of the Methodist Church of Canada, was recommended, his credentials read, and after assenting to our Church doctrines and polity, on motion of R. Haney, was admitted. On motion of J. W. Haney, the credentials and recommendations of Dr. Jaques were returned to him, in accordance with his wish.

Delinquents.—The Committee on Blanks reported the delinquent charges.

Finding of the Select Number.—The finding of the Select Number in the case of W. H. Simpson, Jr., was read and his character passed. (See Finding of Select Number.) C. Haney read a telegram from W. H. Simpson, Jr., stating that he was sick with the yellow fever. On motion the Secretary was instructed to send the findings of the court and an expression of sympathy to Brother Simpson.

Papers referring to Hedding College and Grand Prairie Seminary were passed to the Committee on Education.

Various papers were passed to the Committee on Conference Relations.

Announcements were made. A motion to adjourn prevailed, a stanza of a hymn was sung, and the Benediction was pronounced by Dr. Stowe.

Third Day.

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 21, 1888.

The Conference met at 8:30 a. m. with Bishop Walden in the chair.

Devotional services were conducted by R. Barton.

Journal.—The minutes of the second day were read. On motion of G. R. Palmer the names of delinquent charges were expunged from the record. The minutes were then approved.

Delinquents.—The Committee on Blanks reported some for correction and the remaining delinquent charges.

On motion of E. Wasmuth, Conference Treasurer, G. R. Palmer was made Assistant Treasurer, in place of A. Smith.

Introduced.—Dr. J. L. Hurlbut, Corresponding Secretary of the Sunday School Union; Dr. S. L. Bowman of De Pauw University; Dr. T. C. Iliff, Superintendent of Missions in Utah; and Dr. H. B. Ridgeway, President of Garrett Biblical Institute, were introduced.

Twentieth Question.—The 20th question was resumed. The name of C. O. McCulloch was called, his character was passed, and he reported his district.

The names of the following Effective Elders were called, their characters passed, they reporting their collections and revival work: B. C. Dennis, J. W. Frizzelle, H. C. Bifch, B. F. Eckley, R. B. Various papers were passed to the Committee on Conference Relations.

The Committee in the case of E. C. Wayman reported, recommending the passage of his character, and on motion of M. V. B. White the report was adopted. His name was then referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.

The American Bible Society was represented by an address to the Conference by Rev. E. G. Smith, agent.

Dr. T. C. Hiff represented his work in Utah, and took a subscription and collection amounting to \$500, towards building an educational institution in Salt Lake City.

Bishop Taylor was called forward and given a seat on the platform.

Dr. G. W. Gray, Assistant Secretary of the Freedmen's Aid and Southern Educational Society, was introduced.

Dr. J. L. Hurlbut addressed the Conference on the Sunday School cause.

Dr. S. L. Bowman addressed the Conference in the interests of De Pauw University.

The Bishop called the names of the class to be received into full connection and notified them to be ready to-morrow at 10:00 a. m.

Various papers concerning Garrett Biblical Institute were passed to the Committee on Education.

The names of J. I. McLaughlin, G. C. Shaffer and Wm. Watson, were substituted for others on the Committee on Conference Relations.

The time for adjournment having arrived, announcements were made, a stanza of the hymn "Rock of Ages," was sung, and the Benediction was pronounced by Bishop Taylor.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Pursuant to adjournment the Conference met at 4:00 P. M. R. Haney called the Conference to order and announced the 491st hymn, after the singing of which Dr. Hiff led in prayer.

Bishop Walden took the chair and announced the 291st hymn, which was sung.

Introduced.—Dr. N. H. Axtell, of the Rock River Conference, and Rev. W. L. Sanders, pastor of the Baptist church of Kankakee, were introduced.

Dr. H. B. Ridgaway addressed the Conference in behalf of Garrett Biblical Institute.

The Order of the Day was taken up. The Preamble and Resolution referring to the re-organization of the Kewanee District were read by the Secretary. On motion of J. W. Haney the time of speeches on this subject was limited to five minutes. The following spoke to the resolution: W. H. Hunter, R. Haney, J. S. Cumming, G. W. Gue, J. G. Evans, P. A. Cool, J. B. Dille and J. W. Haney. After some remarks by the Bishop the following was offered by G. J. Luckey as a substitute for the resolution before the Conference: Resolved, "That the Presiding Elders be instructed to bring the matter of increasing the number of Districts before their Quarterly Conferences during the coming year." After remarks by a number, a motion to adjourn was carried. A verse was sung and the Benediction was pronounced by Dr. Axtell.

Fourth Day.

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 22, 1888.

Conference met at 8:30 A. M., Bishop Walden in the chair.

J. W. Haney conducted the devotional services.

Journal.—The Minutes of Friday morning and afternoon sessions were read and approved.

Unfinished Business.—On motion of W. H. Hunter the unfinished business before the Conference was postponed to give way to minute business.

Leave of Absence.—On motion of R. Haney, D. M. Hill was granted a leave of absence.

The Fourteenth Question.—"What Traveling Deacons have been elected Elders?" was called. The characters of the following were passed, their collections and revival work reported, the Committee of Examination reported, and in each case they were elected Elders: A. A. Waters, C. W. Cordes and C. W. Whorrall. G. L. Reed was passed and continued. The name of C. L. Davenport was called, but his case was postponed, he not having appeared before the Examination Committee.

The Tenth Question.—"What Local Preachers have been elected Deacons?" was called. The name of Frederick H. Northrop was called and he was recommended in due form, the Committee of Examination reported, the Presiding Elder represented him and on motion he was elected to Deacon's orders.

Excused.—On motion the Committee of Examination of Second Year was excused to examine persons who had not been before it.

The Sixteenth Question.—"What Local Deacons have been elected Elders?" was called. No names were presented.

The Third Question.—"Who remain on Trial?" was called. The characters of the following named were passed, collections and revival work reported, the Committee of Examination reported, their respective Presiding Elders represented them, and on motion in each case they were continued and advanced to the class of the second year: Wm. Thomas A. Beall passed and advanced to second year.

M. T. Fulcher and C. E. Giwits were discontinued at their own request.

The Second Question.—"Who are Admitted on Trial?" was called. Thelispore Leveque was recommended in due form and was introduced. The Committee of Examination reported, his Presiding Elder represented him and he was admitted on Trial.

The Thirteenth Question.—"Who are the Traveling Deacons of the second class?" was called. The characters of the following named were passed, collections and revival work reported. The Committee of Examination reported, their respective Presiding Elders represented them, and on motion in each case they were advanced to Deacons of the second class: W. J. Corr, Henry B. J. H. Hobbs is required to be examined next year in psychology, and H. Coolidge in 2nd Volume of Pope's Theology.

The characters of O. T. Dwinell, A. J. Newell, and Ira O. Mallory were passed and they were continued as Deacons of the first class with privilege of two years' examinations at next Conference session.

Bishop Wm. Taylor very affectingly bade the Conference good-bye.

Dr. G. W. Gray, Assistant Secretary of the Freedmen's Aid and Southern Educational Society addressed the Conference briefly.

The Fifth Question.—"Who are Admitted into full Connection?" was taken up. Ransom Y. Hazard, Asa P. Beall, John H. McMeen, J. L. Miller, Wm. B. Shoop, Emanuel J. Baskerville, and Marion M. McCreight were called forward.

The Bishop stated that in the three years W. B. Shoop had been on trial, part of the time had been spent in school, but he thought two years of service had been rendered, and if the Conference was satisfied on that point, his name could be presented under the call of the Fifth Question. By vote the Conference expressed itself as so satisfied.

A hymn was sung and prayer was offered by W. H. Hunter. On motion the time was extended. The Bishop addressed the class on the work of the Ministry, and propounded the Disciplinary Questions, to which each one gave satisfactory answers. The characters of the above named were passed, their collections and revival work announced. The Committee of Examination reported, their respective Presiding Elders represented them and on motion in each case they were admitted into full connection in the Conference.

R. Y. Hazard, A. P. Beall, J. H. McMeen, W. B. Shoop and E. J. Baskerville were elected to Deacons' orders. J. L. Miller and M. M. McCreight having been previously ordained.

M. C. Bowlin.—On Motion of P. A. Cool the name of M. C. Bowlin was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.

A telegram from D. T. Wilson was passed to the same Committee.

Board of Stewards.—The Secretary of the Board of Stewards read a preliminary report on the classes of the Conference Claimants, fixing the basis for the distribution of funds. On motion of J. G. Evans the report was adopted.

On motion of J. W. Haney it was voted that when we adjourn we do so to meet in Memorial Session to-morrow at 3:00 P. M.

Announcements were made, a stanza was sung and the Benediction was pronounced by Dr. R. Haney.

Fifth Day.

MEMORIAL SESSION.

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 23, 1888.

Pursuant to adjournment the Conference met in Memorial Session at 3 P. M., with Bishop Walden in the chair. R. Haney, Chairman of the Committee on Memoirs, directed the order of exercises. The 1033d hymn was sung after which prayer was offered by A. K. Tullis. After a beautiful anthem by the choir, and remarks by the Bishop on the appropriateness of the service, R. Barton was called to read a memoir of Mrs. Mary A. Tubbs. This was followed by a beautiful tribute paid the deceased by W. H. Hunter.

The memoir of Rev. James H. Scott was read by G. W. Gue, who followed the reading by appreciative remarks.

The 994th hymn was sung.

The memoir of the Rev. S. S. Gruber was read by G. L. Taylor, who further testified concerning the godly character and earnest zeal of the deceased.

Two stanzas of hymn No. 991 were sung.

The memoir of Rev. Andrew Magee was read by J. S. Cumming, who supplemented the paper with remarks full of tender memories of the deceased.

A part of the hymn "I would not live always," was sung.

The Session concluded with the ordination of the persons who had been elected to Deacons' and Elders' orders, the singing of the Doxology, and the pronouncing of the Benediction.

The Conference assembled at 8:30 A. M., with Bishop Walden in the chair.

Devotional exercises were conducted by C. W. Ayling.

The Minutes of the Saturday and Memorial Sessions were read and approved.

Traveling Expenses.—On motion of C. O. McCulloch it was ordered to pay the expenses of A. K. Tullis to and from Peoria out of the Minute Fund.

Memoirs.—On motion of P. A. Cool the Secretary was instructed to publish the Memoirs in the Minutes.

Dr. C. H. Payne, Secretary of the Board of Education, was introduced.

Certificates of Ordination.—The Bishop filed with the Secretary the following certificate of the ordination of the classes of Deacons and Elders:

On motion of J. S. Cumming the Secretary was instructed to respond to the above.

Dr. Payne addressed the Conference on the subject of our Educational Work, and answered many inquiries concerning it.

Dr. J. R. Jaques addressed the Conference in the interest of Hedding College.

Conference Reporter.—W. G. Miller was appointed Conference Reporter in place of F. H. Cumming.

Re-organization of Districts.—On motion of W. H. Hunter the subject of the re-organization of Kewanee District was taken up.

The Secretary read the preamble and resolution relating to this subject, and also the substitute offered by G. J. Luckey. The substitute was withdrawn and the following substitute was offered by M. V. B. After some debate the previous question was moved by J. A. Souders and carried. The substitute was rejected. A *seriatim* vote on the report was called for and ordered by vote. The first item was adopted and the second rejected. The report was adopted. (See report.)

A resolution was read and adopted by a count vote requesting the Board of Bishops to fix the time of holding the next Conference so as to include the first Sunday in October.

B. W. Baker read a special report from a Committee of Wesleyan University. On motion of F. H. Cumming it was referred to the Chairman of the Committee on Education, for editing, as an addition to their report.

A resolution in reference to the "Gospel in all Lands," was read and adopted. (See resolution.)

Preamble and resolution of thanks to the people of Kankakee, and others, was adopted by a rising vote. (See resolution.)

Minutes of the afternoon sessions read and approved.

Resolution of thanks to the Secretaries and Assistants read and adopted by a rising vote.

Note for Statistical Tables.

According to orders no cents appear in these columns; hence some charges will be reported fractions of dollars less than they paid. But, where the Secretary was able, he added these fractions together, and gave credit for a dollar. For example, where report said \$50.30 for missions from Churches, and \$10.70 from Sunday School, the Church will be credited with \$51.00, or the Sunday School with \$11.00, so that the total will balance. So where report read S. S. Union \$2.50, and Tracts \$2.50, it will frequently appear that one of these is reported \$3.00 and the other \$2.00, so that the charge could have all the credit possible.

EDUCATION.

Your Committee submits the following report:

We regret very much the fact that in many of our charges Children's Day is not observed, or its collections are applied in other directions than that for which the Church authorizes this collection. We therefore recommend that our pastors see that this day be appropriately observed, and that its collections be forwarded at once to our Board of Education, that its funds may be properly distributed where they may meet as far as possibly the urgent demands and pressing needs of that fund and of those dependent upon it for aid in securing an education.

GRAND PRAIRIE SEMINARY.

This Institution is enjoying increased prosperity, graduating last June, twelve in the Literary, and twenty-six in the Commercial Departments; the roster showed two hundred and sixteen pupils for the winter term. The Executive Board found it necessary to build a Dormitory. This structure is 36x72 with four floors, and a Hall of Art in the mansard story. Dr. J. G. Evans, acting as solicitor, has raised \$6,300 of the \$9,000 necessary to its completion. The school is practically out of debt, and its prospects for the current year are most encouraging. We recommend the appointment of Rev. E. McClish, D. D. as President, Rev. C. E. Pickett, as Professor, and Rev. J. G. Evans, D. D., as Financial Secretary. Also we recommend the appointment of Revs. G. J. Luckey, R. B. Williams, H. C. Birch, W. R. Warner, and R. L. Vivian as Conference Visitors.

HEDDING COLLEGE.

The Trustees of Hedding College report a prosperous year just closed and another opening full of promise. They report a steady increase in the attendance and a year closed without any increase in the indebtedness of the college. Among the matters worthy of special mention are the religious spirit and influence maintained and the high grade of class work done in all its departments. Much needed and extensive improvements have been made in the past year in the purchase of new apparatus for the department of Natural Science. We are pleased also to note the continued thrift of the literary societies, and the harmony be-

tween the students and faculty. We recommend that Rev. M. A. Head, who has labored so faithfully throughout the year now closing, as Financial Secretary, be re-appointed, and that Dr. J. R. Jaques, D. D., be appointed as President, and Rev. T. A. Beal, A. B., as Professor in the College. As Trustees to take the place of those whose term expires in the year 1888, we concur with the board in recommending the following: Revs. J. W. Haney, H. D. Clark, A. K. Tullis, and F. H. Cumming; also Messrs. J. N. Reed, D. A. Clark, Frank Quinby and J. G. Walker. To fill the vacancy on the Board of Trustees occasioned by the resignation of E. B. Hardy we recommend Dr. Madison Reece. We recommend as Visitors, Revs. M. A. Head, W. H. Witter, H. J. Boatman, A. M. Stocking, and R. Haney, D. D.

ILLINOIS WESLEYAN UNIVERSITY.

We heartily endorse the election of Dr. W. H. Wilder D. D., as President of the University, and will accord to him the most hearty welcome when convenient to him to visit our charges. The first term of the present year opens very auspiciously and promises a large increase in the attendance.

Actual Endowment of the Institution \$72,989.11. Of this amount \$41,931.36., consists in well secured interest-bearing notes and cash to be loaned; \$27,406.75. in notes not secured; \$2,740.00. in real estate; and \$911.00. in interest notes not yet due, and educational notes. None of this Endowment is loaned on personal security only. Annual income from Endowment \$4,086.97. Endowment non-productive amounts to \$7,947.00. Interest due and unpaid on Endowment \$530.00. Receipts from tuition last year, \$5,787.50; Incidental fees, \$889.00; Total \$6,676.50, which is the least received for the last ten years, the college being without a President assigned as cause. Received from diploma fees last year, \$105.00, and from post-graduate fees, \$910.75; Total \$1,015.75. Bonded Indebtedness of the University \$22,000.

We recommend for election as Trustees, Owen T. Reeves, David T. Douglas, Joseph B. Ayres, and Rev. S. VanPelt; as Visitors, Revs. C. O. McCulloch, R. Crewes, H. D. Clark, J. W. Denning, John H. Scott, P. A. Cool, and T. Doney.

NORTHWESTERN UNIVERSITY.

The Trustees of the Northwestern University report a greatly increased attendance. We make special mention of the new Astronomical Observatory; and the great telescope, recently transferred from Chicago to Evanston. The School of Dental Surgery, is a grand success. The Endowment of more than one million of dollars, is growing. We recommend the appointment of Rev. R. D. Russell as Trustee from this Conference.

THEOLOGICAL SCHOOLS.

We would impress upon the mind of any who are preparing for the ministry the importance of completing a thorough college course before entering our Schools of Theology, as a much needed preparation for their seminary work.

GARRETT BIBLICAL INSTITUTE.

We are gratified at the continued prosperity of Garrett Biblical Institute, as reported through our board of visitors. This school is thoroughly equipped with buildings and libraries, and the annual examinations bore evidence of the most thorough class work in all its departments. We cheerfully commend it to candidates, in our territory, for the Christian Ministry. We recommend as Visitors Revs. B. F. Tallman and S. VanPelt.

SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY, DE PAUW UNIVERSITY.

Having heard the report of the Dean of this Institution, Dr. S. L. Bowman, we cordially commend it to the young men preparing for the ministry, within the bounds of our Conference. Any desiring information concerning the school are invited to correspond with the Dean at Greencastle, Indiana. We recommend as Visitors Drs. J. G. Evans, and E. McClish to attend the examinations May 26-29, 1889.

STATE OF THE CHURCH.

With profound gratitude to Almighty God we record the marked spiritual and material prosperity of Methodism during the past year. Throughout our Conference the revival spirit has prevailed, resulting in an increase of spirituality and an unusual number of accessions to the Church. As is shown by the reports of our colleges and seminaries greater attention is given to Christian education. As the concomitant of growth in grace is an increase of knowledge, and as the culture of the heart implies the training of the intellect, we could but expect that the advance of the Church in spiritual lines should demand greater intellectual vigor and attainment. This demand is manifest and imperative. The education of our people is a hopeful sign when we consider that, while the percentage of the number of graduates of other institutions of learning which enter the Christian ministry has rapidly *decreased* for many years; in *our* educational institutions this percentage has steadily *advanced* until *more* than half of our graduates enter this sacred calling.

In the material prosperity of our Church we have great cause for thanksgiving. The number of new churches and parsonages erected during the past year, the many and varied improvements in church property, and the extensive plans for further extension and improvement indicate an advance of a high order.

With delight do we cherish the thought that now, as in all former periods of our history, our Church occupies a foremost position in all reforms which attract the attention of the people and promise to advance, enlighten, and ennoble the race.

As Christians we must "Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy." As a Church we should labor earnestly and faithfully to overcome the pernicious practices of the masses in the desecration of the Sabbath. Without the proper observance of the Sabbath as a day of rest, its object as a day of worship can never be realized. In the proper observance of the day we urge our people to discountenance Sunday newspapers, Sunday railway trains, Sunday mails, and Sunday excursions and picnics. Also, in the proper conduct of our camp-meetings we need to exercise righteous judgment. In view of the action of the late General Conference, and with a knowledge of the recent decisions of the courts of the land, the charging of gate fees on Sunday is a practice which should be abolished.

We desire to express our hearty appreciation of the improvements in the methods of raising money for the support of the Church and her connectional enterprises. The elimination of lotteries, church fairs, and other questionable factors from this problem whose solution is only by the Gospel method, makes Christian giving possible and is full of promise for the future. The increase in the benevolent collections of the Church is to be appreciated as it shows a more equal advance in all of the collections. The pressing of any one of these claims at the expense of any or all of the others should be discouraged. An equalized extension of the benevolences is urged as intended to promote the highest growth of this important part of our Church work. We recommend every Church to secure and faithfully keep a record of its contributions to the various benevolent collections of the Church. Such book can be obtained of our Book Concern.

Recognizing the press as a potent factor in the education of the people we would encourage the extensive distribution of Methodist literature among our people. We advise the circulation and use of our books and periodicals in our Sunday schools and in the homes of Methodists. We believe this to be the most effective means of securing the disuse of questionable and pernicious kinds of literature and of meeting the pressing need of a better knowledge of our doctrines and usages. Let every pastor do his duty in this direction and grand results will most surely follow.

With pleasure we note the increasing attention which is being given to the social meetings of our Church. With the needed revival of our prayer and class meetings will come a general revival throughout the Church which will lead to the salvation of souls. By special preparation for, and proper conduct of, these meetings the pastor will secure a constantly increasing attendance, and make this work of the Church a most fruitful source of good to all.

Finally, we point with just pride to those organizations of our Church which have for their object the social, intellectual, benevolent and spiritual advancement of our young people. Chief among these is the Oxford League, than which no greater or more helpful agency for the development of young workers in the Church can be found. It seeks the revival of the fourfold work of the original Oxford Club founded by the Wesleys. It demands no new machinery but calls into

operation the already existing appliances of the Church and renders them effective. It includes the work suggested by the "Young People's Christian Alliance," and seeks to utilize every available force as well as to promote the highest culture of both heart and head. We most earnestly recommend the organization of an Oxford League in every Church within the bounds of our Conference. R. G. PEARCE, *President*.

Resolved, That we pledge ourselves to renewed diligence in circulating our literature.

2nd. That we regard the Northwestern Christian Advocate as a superior religious paper, that it should regularly enter the homes of our people and receive their heartiest support.

3d. That we regard the Methodist Review a great help to the Ministry of our Church, an able exponent of Methodism, and that its increasing popularity merits our heartiest approval and patronage.

4th. That the Gospel in All Lands being the only distinctively Missionary journal of our Church, is essential to the thorough understanding of the field occupied by Methodism, and we commend it to the favorable consideration of all our Preachers and people.

5th. That we recognize *Our Youth* as a periodical ably conducted, instructive and elevating, and admirably adapted to meet the wants of our young people, and worthy of a place in every home.

6th. That we urge upon all our Sunday School Boards the use of our own Church publications.

7th. That we reiterate our convictions that every official member of the Church ought to take and read one of our Church papers.

Your Committee would also beg leave to report that we find about \$4000 of debt to the Book Concern from the members of this Conference, and those who have been. Also, that we recommend that some plan be devised by which a thorough sifting of these debts shall be made, and avoid the necessity of carrying year after year the accounts of those who have long been dead, and whose estates are insolvent, as well as the accounts of some who are living and, seemingly, can never pay.

Resolved, That we recommend that all our Ministers preach Anniversary Sermons during the month of January, 1889.

2d. That we will carry out the plan in the Anniversary Celebration, which the General Book Committee has arranged for that purpose, as far as practicable.

1st. We re-affirm the utterances on total abstinence and the suppression of the liquor traffic heretofore made by this Conference.

2d. Believing that the Temperance reform, that has engaged so much of public attention, has never had an abler presentation than in the last General Conference. Therefore,

Resolved, That we adopt the report on that subject made by the General Conference as our own platform and report, and that said report be published in our Minutes.

REPORT OF GENERAL CONFERENCE.

(Adopted May 24.)

Reaffirming all our former deliverances on total abstinence and the prohibition of the liquor traffic, we submit for your adoption the following sections:

I.—PROGRESS AND DUTY.

We have ample reason for congratulation that the temperance reform is engaging public attention as never before. While some minds are yet torpid, not apprehending the vital issues, and while, to some in-

tense reformers, such loitering in the march of reform seems unpardonable, nevertheless a growing multitude of redoubtable men and women are learning both to wait and hasten with Providence. In this great moral advance, we recognize the duty of the Methodist Episcopal Church, with all other Christian bodies to march at the head of the column to inspire and direct the movement.

II.—TEMPERANCE ORGANIZATIONS.

In response to the memorial addressed to this body by the Women's Christian Temperance Union, we gladly recognize, with high appreciation, their great work, "preventive, educational, evangelistic, social, and legal," and the extension of its sphere, through its eminent representatives abroad in the great Foreign Mission countries. We also tender fraternal greetings and a hearty God speed to the National Temperance Society, and all other organizations engaged in advancing this reform, especially to all who labor upon a Gospel temperance basis. We welcome our adopted fellow-citizens to these expanding ranks. We urge a spirit of kindly conciliation and cordial co-operation among all temperance workers. We recommend that the Temperance Committees appointed by the Quarterly Conferences in all our charges, and the Annual Conference Temperance Societies, seek to enlist our people more fully in this great movement against the drink customs and the drink traffic which disgrace our civilization.

III.—TOTAL ABSTINENCE.

We renew our time-honored testimony in favor of total abstinence from all alcoholic liquors. The best modern science has irrefragably demonstrated that there is no legitimate place for alcohol, not even in the form of the milder liquors, and in however moderate quantities, in a healthy living organism. This testimony of science has been independently confirmed by the impartial demonstrations of life insurance experts, critically seeking sure bases on which to conduct great financial interests. Total abstinence is now fully vindicated as something more than "a dietetic whim," or a fanatical craze; and we can accept of nothing less than this, as security for personal safety, and as the basal principle of the temperance reform.

IV.—SCIENTIFIC TEMPERANCE INSTRUCTION.

We hail with joy the enactment of laws providing for scientific temperance instruction in the public schools of thirty-four States and Territories, under which six and a half million of children and youth are being taught the evils of alcoholic beverages. We urge that those laws be strengthened, wherever necessary, by suitable self-enforcing penalties. We also call for the exclusion from the schools of those professedly temperance, but fatally misleading textbooks, which directly or impliedly encourage the moderate use of the milder intoxicants. We are glad to learn that many of the publishers of such books have undertaken a revision, and are now bringing them to the scientific standard of total abstinence. Let the text books which are to shape our children's lives be closely scrutinized.

V.—RAISING OF GRAPES, HOPS, ETC.

We approve the action of the Lay Electoral Conference of California, condemning the raising and selling of grapes for the manufacture of fermented wine, and we think the time has come for a broader utterance upon this subject. We warn our members against raising and selling, not only grapes, but also other fruits, hops, and grain, for the manufacture of alcoholic liquors, as inconsistent with Christian profession, numbing to the conscience and hurtful to the cause of temperance and true piety. These practices bring the Church into complicity with the great liquor nuisance, paralyze our efforts and afford comfort to the greatest enemy of modern Christianity.

VI.—OUR RELATION TO THE LIQUOR TRAFFIC.

We reiterate the language of the Episcopal Address to this body:

"The liquor traffic is so pernicious in all its bearings, so inimical to the interests of honest trade, so repugnant to the moral sense, so injurious to the peace and order of society, so hurtful to the home, to the Church and to the body politic, and so utterly antagonistic to all that is precious in life, that the *only* proper attitude toward it, for Christians, is that of *relentless hostility*. *It can never be legalized without sin.*" And we, furthermore, emphatically declare that men engaged in the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages ought not to receive the suffrages of Christian people for any political office; or any position of influence on educational boards.

VII.—PRACTICAL POLITICAL ACTION.

One of the darkest reproaches of our time is that the saloon has been allowed to become a political gambler, and to do brokerage business with the ballot-box, as a part of its stock in trade. Saloons and corrupt politicians constitute an equation, both members of which have a ballot-box value, and are easily transferred. We urge it as an imperative duty of Christian men to attend the primaries, to wrest the sovereignty of the caucus from the grip of the saloon, to purify and elevate the caucus by their presence, and make it a promoter of morals and good order. Beginning with the caucus, let us work upward through all the departments of legitimate civil action, until our entire citizenship is emancipated from this bondage. We must supplant the five or six thousand legislators and the tens of thousands of municipal officers, who have long stood as the body guard of the saloon in its ravages upon the home.

VIII.—ENFORCEMENT OF LIQUOR LAWS.

The habitual non-enforcement of law is an impediment in the way of all true, moral and social reforms; we rejoice in the awakening sentiment among the American people in favor of a more rigorous enforcement of civil statutes. We are grateful to those eminent civilians in Chicago, New York City and elsewhere, who, in very conspicuous instances, within a few years, have so effectively vindicated the sanctions of law and government. We hold in profound veneration the heroic ex-

ample of our martyred brother, the Rev. Geo. C. Haddock, struck down by an assassin's bullet while protecting society against saloon lawlessness; and, believing that one of the most important methods for promoting temperance is to enforce law, we call upon our people every where, without distinction of party, to lend their efforts for the faithful administration of the restrictive, suppressive and prohibitory features of existing liquor laws.

IX.—THE LEGAL STATUS OF THE LIQUOR TRAFFIC.

We rejoice in the decision of the Supreme Court, at Washington, D. C., in December last, fully vindicating the most radical legislation against the liquor traffic in our most advanced prohibitory States. Fully realizing the difficulty of protecting society by merely moral forces, against evils sanctioned under the broad seal of the commonwealth, we call upon all our people to assist in securing in all the States, as rapidly as possible, such legislation that the liquor dealers "shall no longer have a law-book as a pillow, nor quiet their consciences with the opiate of a court license." The absolute suppression of the saloon is our objective point. Some States and some localities cannot advance as rapidly as others. We will often find the means for securing our objects dependent upon conditions we cannot easily, or at once control, and the judgment and conscience of every citizen must be left free to determine for himself what course he will pursue. While, however, we concentrate everywhere upon the best practicable measures, let us see to it that all our movements are real advances, and that we never trail our banner.

X.—CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS.

We call for the aid of State and National constitutional amendments for the suppression of the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages. Confident that a very considerable and respectable portion of American citizens desire to take their cause against the saloon for adjudication before the great tribunal of the sovereign people, whose prerogative it is, in a country like ours, to decide fundamental issues in the last resort. We believe it to be the wisest policy and the supreme duty of all legislative bodies to enact such legislation that, under the form of the Constitution, the people may protect the home against the saloon, by no-license votes, under a local option regime, and, as soon as possible, by constitutional prohibitory amendments. "To deny the people this privilege," said a committee of United States' Senators, "is the very essence of despotism; and to unreasonably refuse such a hearing, is just cause for a revolution."

XI.—ABOLITION OF THE LIQUOR TRAFFIC IN THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA.

Inasmuch as we are credibly informed that bills are now before both Houses of Congress for the abolition of the traffic in alcoholic beverages in the District of Columbia; and inasmuch as the wisest statesmen and philanthropists have often pronounced the liquor traffic one of the direst enemies of civilization and human progress; and inasmuch as the Congress of the United States possesses unquestioned authority to

abolish this traffic in the District of Columbia; therefore, this General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, representing seven millions of communicants and adherents in these United States, respectfully memorialize Congress to pass a bill which shall outlaw the liquor traffic in the District of Columbia; therefore,

Resolved, That a copy of this memorial shall be forwarded to Congress, signed by the Secretary of the Board of Bishops and the Secretary of the General Conference.

XII.—INTER-STATE LIQUOR TRAFFIC.

Inasmuch as human experience has taught that the use of alcoholic beverages is a national curse, blighting the lives, corrupting the morals, and sapping the material strength of the commonwealth;

And inasmuch as certain States, namely, Maine, Kansas, Iowa, Vermont, and Rhode Island have enacted laws prohibiting the manufacture and sale of alcoholic liquors as beverages;

And inasmuch as the Supreme Court of the United States has decided that such legislation is constitutional;

And inasmuch as said Supreme Court has decided that intoxicating liquors, in original packages, may be carried or transported from other States, and from foreign countries, and delivered to consignees within the several States before named;

Therefore, it is the judgment of this General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, that when the people of any State, by due legislative enactment, pronounce such articles contraband, on account of their injurious effects upon the people, it is then the duty of the General Government to declare said liquors liable to exclusion and confiscation.

We would also respectfully inquire whether the right, long claimed by Congress, to promote inter-State commerce, for the real or supposed good of the State, does not imply the right and duty also to restrict or prevent such inter-State commerce as inflicts real or supposed *injury* upon States, and especially when the States themselves have so adjudged and enacted by laws prohibiting the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages?

In view of the foregoing reasons, this General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, in quadrennial session assembled, respectfully and earnestly memorialize the Congress of the United States to adopt such legislation as will secure to States with prohibitory liquor laws, the undisturbed benefits of the restrictive and prohibitory provisions enacted for their self-defense against a most noxious and destructive evil.

Resolved, That a copy of this memorial, signed by the Secretary of the Board of Bishops and the Secretary of the General Conference, be forwarded to Congress.

XIII.—RUM AND NATIVE HEATHEN.

It is a matter of record that the advent among the heathen of men educated under the light of the Gospel is associated with the blackest curses that have blighted the lives of those for whom Christ died.

While, in one pathetic sense, Ethiopia has stretched forth her hands unto God, in one other sense the "Dark Continent" may well stretch forth her hands in prayer for protection against those who have stained her shores with a trail of blood that reddens "the middle passage" between Africa and one inconsistent republic. Little wonder that the poor African shudders at the name of Christian America.

The history of the slave-trade is enough to make the "West Coast" verily hate the name of those who desolated her borders, and caused her ebony Rachels to mourn for the children who met a fate worse than death. Worse than night-attacks; worse than chains for innocent babes; worse than the prostitution of mothers; worse than the wailing caravan; worse than the sweltering barracoon; worse than the stifling slave-ships; worse than the shameless auction block; worse than the fetter, the whip, and the separation of families; worse than the traffic in human muscles and souls, is the inhuman trade in rum which now crowns the outrage to which the natives of Asia and Africa are subject at the hands of nominally Christian States!

No fetters that bind men in human slavery are comparable to the bondage to human appetite, which makes the stricken victim an impotent consenting party to his own ruin and degradation. Under the sacred name of "Christian commerce" cargoes of rum are carried abroad to fasten upon those children of nature a blight that has no parallel in the list of curses which follow in the trail of civilization. We hear of whole tribes falling into the fate that has already ruined the North American Indian. We read of entire villages lying in the stupefaction of a simultaneous debauch. We hear the pathetic wail of native chiefs, who curse the day that heralded the advent of the white man. We read of thousands of women and children victims of the poison brewed in American, English, and European distilleries.

Meantime, God is angry with the ruthless traffic that ruins the bodies of men and imprisons their souls in the bonds of "the second death." Among the cloud of witnesses who have protested against this wrong, is Sir Richard Burton, the famous African traveler, who declares his sincere belief that—

"If the slave-trade were revived, with all its horrors, and Africa could get rid of the white man, with the gun-powder and rum which he has introduced, Africa would be the gainer in happiness by the exchange."

While we are combating this evil and its sway among those who, realizing its fruits, may be supposed to prefer and procure their own degradation, it is the duty of Christian nations to unite to protect those who, like children, would seem to be the wards of civilization; therefore,

Resolved, 1. That this General Conference declares its sincere sympathy with the efforts being made by our English brethren, by the National Temperance Society, in this city, and others, to abate the direful curse of rum, which desolates the doubly "Dark Continent."

2. That we will hail the day when both bond and free shall be unmitted from the thralldom of the drink-traffic, and when all men shall unite to anathematize him "who putteth the bottle to his neighbor's lips."

XIV.—PRINTING.

Resolved, That the Tract Society of our Church be requested by this General Conference, to print the whole of this temperance report, in a cheap tract form, for wide circulation among our people.

2d. That we recommend to the officers and members of the Auxiliaries, the adoption of any and all lawful and expedient means that will increase their effectiveness.

3d. That we recommend the organization of Auxiliaries in all practicable places where none exist.

4th. That we, as pastors, pledge our hearty co-operation in all the work of these societies.

5th. That we extend to the "Training Schools for Missionaries," our cordial support and heartiest sympathies.

EPISCOPAL FUND.

Your Committee on Episcopal Fund would call attention to the provisions of the Discipline for the support of the Bishops. In paragraph 361 of the Discipline we find the following imperative requirement:

“The amount apportioned to each pastoral charge for the support of the Bishops shall be a *pro rata* claim with that of the stationed Preachers and Presiding Elders; and no such Preacher or Presiding Elder shall be entitled to his allowance except to the extent to which the claims of the Bishops are also met by the Circuit, Station, or District, with which such Elder and Preacher are connected.”

A careful examination of our published Minutes reveals the fact that in a large majority of the reports this disciplinary provision is faithfully observed, but in quite a number of cases the amount reported for the Episcopal Fund, falls far below the *pro rata* division as required by the Discipline. We therefore present the following resolution for adoption:

Resolved, That the Presiding Elders of this Conference be requested to see that the provisions of the Discipline for the *pro rata* division of funds raised for Ministerial support are carried out.

MEMOIRS.

REV. SAMUEL S. GRUBER, M. D.

Samuel S. Gruber was born in Lancaster, Pa., May 7, 1819. At the age of 12 he was born again, "Not of the will of the flesh, nor of man, but of the Spirit of God." He immediately assumed the responsibilities of membership in the Methodist Episcopal Church.

He was a graduate of Rush Medical College and practiced medicine for twelve years.

In November, 1852, he was married to Miss Josephine Head, who has been a worthy companion in all his work. Bro. Gruber became a member of the Rock River Conference in 1854, and immediately transferred to the Iowa Conference, where he efficiently preached Jesus and the resurrection for seven years. He was transferred back to this Conference in 1861, and among the charges he served are Ipava, Kickapoo, Trivoli, Cuba, Sheffield, Milford, Saunemin, Buckley, Graymont, Sibley and Strawn.

In 1885 he was granted a superannuated relation at his own request. One year ago, Presiding Elder C. O. McCulloch appointed Dr. Gruber as a supply for the Iroquois charge, and about the 1st of November he moved to the work, full of faith and the Holy Ghost. November 30, 1887, in company with his wife and daughter he went to the depot in Iroquois to take the train for Sheldon, but being a little early he went upon the bridge that spans the Iroquois river at that place, to converse with a man on the subject of personal salvation. Hearing a train approaching he started back to the depot, which was but a short distance, keeping the main track, expecting that this train would side track for the passenger on which he expected to go. But misjudging the rapidity of the train, which was running at the unlawful speed of thirty-five miles an hour, he was struck by the engine and thrown 90 feet, instantly killing him. How sudden the transition from earthly scenes to heavenly delights—from labor to reward—as he went sweeping to the place of God.

As a Christian he lived, full of years and ripe for the crown of eternal life. Dr. Gruber's Christianity was his life. It was within him as a completely prevailing presence and purpose, not merely clothing him as a loose garment. It shone out in all his words and deeds. His life was a radiation, God made him to shine. He was a man of strong convictions, ever ready vigorously to combat evil, without fear or hesitation. He was true to every interest of truth and right, of patriotism and philanthropy, of charity and piety. During his useful life he rendered efficient service to his fellow men, and many a household mourned when the sad intelligence of his death was borne to their firesides. His life shone on unto the fullness of the day that beams with bliss forever.

Having served his generation by the will of God, he fell asleep in Jesus and was gathered to his fathers at a good old age, as a shock of corn is gathered in his season.

“Fallen on Zion's field, a fearless warrior,
Who long had fought against error's great might;
Armed with the panoply of faith from heaven,
He, always firm, contended for the right.”

We tender our affectionate sympathy to Sister Gruber and her daughter, in this their great bereavement.

DR. ANDREW MAGEE.

Andrew Magee was born in Franklin County, Pa., March 22d 1807. He was brought up in the Presbyterian Church, and being converted in early life, at the first opportunity united with that Church. After thorough consideration, in more mature years, he joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, in the membership and ministry of which he spent his life.

He was married to Miss Mary E. Fultz, in Mifflin County, Pa., January 20th, 1829, with whom he lived happily until June 1879, when she passed away to her heavenly rest. One daughter died a few years before her mother, one lives in Iowa, another, Mrs. Durst, lives in Bushnell, Ill. The son Thomas, at whose house the Doctor spent the last few years of his life, lives in Prairie City, Ill.

After being married, Dr. Magee removed to Ohio, where he was admitted to the bar, in 1838. Being dissatisfied with the law, and feeling that this was not his life-work, he spent one year in the practice of medicine, and then he yielded to the movings of the Holy Ghost and entered the Christian ministry. In 1841 he was admitted on trial in the Pittsburg Conference in which he labored fifteen years, and in 1856 he came

to the Central Illinois Conference, in which he was an active and efficient worker until 1875, when he was superannuated, which relation he held until death.

The following is a list of his appointments in the Pittsburg Conference:

1841, Morristown, Ohio, one year; 1842, Washington, Ohio, two years; 1844, Birmingham, Ohio, two years; 1846, Senecaville, Ohio, two years; 1848, Deersville, Ohio, two years; 1850, Adamsville, Ohio, two years; 1852, Cambridge, Ohio, two years; 1854, New Philadelphia, Ohio, two years.

In the Central Illinois Conference:

1856, Farmington, Illinois, two years; 1858, Canton, Illinois, two years; 1860, Presiding Elder of Macomb District, two years; 1862, Farmington, Illinois, two years; 1864, Galesburg, Illinois, three years; 1867, 1st Church, Peoria, Illinois, two years; 1869, Monmouth, Illinois, two years; 1871, Bushnell, Illinois, two years; 1873, Prairie City, Illinois, two years; 1875, Superannuated.

He was very highly honored by his brethren. He was elected to the General Conference three times, first by the Pittsburg Conference to the General Conference, which met in Boston in 1852, second by the Central Illinois Conference to the General Conference which met in Buffalo, in 1860, and again he was elected by the Central Illinois Conference to the General Conference which met in Chicago in 1868, but after the election, the Conference passed resolutions, instructing the delegates upon the subject of Lay Representation, which were not satisfactory to the Doctor, and he tendered his resignation, and another was elected in his place. He served two years with great acceptability as Presiding Elder, and as the work was not congenial, by his own request, at the end of his second year, he was relieved.

Being a good judge of the law, he was frequently appointed chairman of the Select Number. And in every position to which he was called he always met the expectation of his brethren.

Analysis of his character is difficult only because of the many things to be said of this honored servant of God. *First, he was Intellectual.* His mind was of a superior order, acute and well informed. Few men have been better posted in the doctrines and polity of the Church of his choice. Hence he was an able expounder of the truth, and a skillful administrator of the Discipline. He was also well read in science and in current literature.

He was Instructive. Being full of information, and "apt to teach," he always gave instruction to those who heard him preach or converse. To this we have the testimony of all classes, ministers or laymen, learned or illiterate. Scholars heard from him words of profound wisdom, and children listened to simple statements of truth to make them "wise

unto salvation." No one could sit under his public ministry, or listen to his private conversation, without receiving information and profit.

He was a man of Principle. This was one of his most marked characteristics. He adhered to truth and right with the tenacity of a martyr. In the old anti-slavery controversy, he occupied no equivocal position. He was unbending in the long continued controversy upon the subject of Lay Representation and earnestly urged the immediate admission of them to the counsels of the Church. In the matter of Sabbath observance, he was rigidly exact, and in the great subject now so prominent, involving the existence of the home and the Church as well as the life of the nation, he was an earnest Prohibitionist. Dr. Magee was so constituted that he could be neutral in nothing, he must take ground where truth and right were involved. He was willing to be in the minority and be right. He accepted the teaching of James Russell Lowell:

"They are slaves who dare not be
In the right with two or three."

He was religious. He was not demonstrative, but quietly adhered to "the truth as it is in Jesus Christ." Neither was he introspective. Like Abraham "he believed God," and unhesitatingly obeyed. "For he looked for a city which hath foundation, whose builder and maker is God." And this faith sustained him in toil and trial, especially in his long affliction. For years he suffered, first, deep bereavement in the death of his wife, with whom he lived for more than fifty years, and who has for nine years waited his coming on the heavenly shore. Then his health gradually failed, until, July 23, 1888, at the age of eighty-one "the weary wheels of life stood still," and his soul went up to God.

As he neared the end, he called his children about him and made disposition of all his business affairs, and gave them his fatherly advice, and assured them that "spiritual matters" had all been attended to long ago. He said that it was "all the same to close his eyes one hour or ten, or close them in death and open them in heaven." But his sufferings are all past. He has gone to join the glorious majority before the throne. "He served his generation by the will of God, and fell on sleep and has been gathered unto his fathers."

"Servant of God, well done!
Thy glorious warfare's past;
The battle's fought, the race is won,
And thou art crowned at last."

REV. JAMES H. SCOTT.

The subject of this memoir was the son of Ephraim and Huldah Scott, and was born at Moorsburg, Columbia County, Pa., February 22, 1824. He was converted at the age of ten years, and soon after united with the Methodist Episcopal Church. When quite young he entered

Alleghany College, Meadville, Pa., and pursued the classical course until he was within one year of graduation, and during the last year of his course his health failed, and he was never permitted to resume his college work.

He was married April 12th, 1849, to Elenor C. Kelley, who has been the patient, uncomplaining sharer of all his toils and trials, and still survives, deeply mourning her loss in his departure. Of their family of five daughters and two sons, one daughter and the two sons are still living. More than half his children went before him to the heavenly world.

In 1850 he entered the ministry in the Baltimore Conference, but was soon after transferred to the Wisconsin Conference. He was ordained Deacon by Bishop Ames at the Conference held at Fond du Lac, Wis., September 5, 1852, and Elder by Bishop Morris at the Conference held at Janesville, Wis., September 3, 1854. In 1858 he was transferred to the Peoria, now Central Illinois Conference, coming to us when our session was held in the city of Bloomington.

While an effective member of this Conference he served faithfully in the following charges: Brimfield, La Prairie Center, New Boston, Colona, Ionia and Kickapoo. From 1865 to 1868 he was superannuated and published at New Boston, Mercer County, Ill., *The New Boston Herald*, a weekly, independent, Republican family newspaper. During this time he also published a work against Spiritualism, entitled "Spiritualism not Divine." In 1882 he published quite a large volume of original poems of much merit.

After traveling a few years he was again superannuated in 1871, after which he removed with his family to Missouri, and settled on a farm near Rolla, in Phelps County. In 1879 he returned to Illinois and settled in Abingdon in order to give his children the opportunity of attending Hedding College. In 1884 he again removed to Rolla, Mo., where, after much suffering, but in great peace of mind, he died April 9, 1888. On his death-bed he spoke tenderly of his four daughters as already safe in heaven, and seemed to commune especially with his daughter Laura, who died at Abingdon in 1880, while a student in Hedding College, an intelligent and promising girl, in the first bloom of young womanhood. Her death was an unspeakable grief to him, and he longed to meet her in heaven.

After his removal to Rolla the second time, he was a member of the faculty of the Conservatory of Music in that place, and secretary of the Official Board of that institution, and much of his time was devoted to the profession of music as tuner and lecturer.

Bro. Scott was a man of energy, and unremitting activity characterized his whole life. In feeble health, and under great difficulties, he

continued his work to the very last. He was intellectual and well-informed. As a preacher, before his health was broken, he was much above the average. In writing he wielded the pen of a ready writer, and in the pulpit commanded attention by the weight of his thoughts and the felicity of his diction.

He has gone from among us, and has doubtless joined the great company of the blood-washed before the throne.

Mrs. MARY A. TUBBS.

Mary A. Tubbs (*nee* Barton), wife of Rev. James Tubbs, of the Central Illinois Conference, was born in Glenville, N. Y., May 12, 1817, and was married to Rev. James Tubbs at Amsterdam, N. Y., in 1848. She was converted in 1837, under the labors of Dr. Levings in Schenectady, and for fifty years adorned the profession of godliness by the example of a holy life.

She was a most exemplary Christian, wife and mother; a woman of fervent piety and unflinching zeal for the cause of Christ and of humanity. Loved, honored and trusted by all who knew her, and most by those who knew her best.

Her religious experience was remarkably even and beautiful, and if it varied from day to day, as we know it must have done, the variation was scarcely perceptible to those who watched her daily life. Like some tall cliff that towers above the storm until its summit is bathed in perpetual sunshine, she seemed to rise above the storms and trials and adversities of this earthly life, and her spirit dwelt in a region of holy calm, basking in the eternal sunshine of Divine peace and love. Storms might gather about her, the surges break at her feet, but with unflinching faith in God she was able to say "None of these things move me." Even-tempered, quiet, and deeply pious, she was always the same cheerful, tender, devoted Christian wife, mother and friend.

Her work is finished: and at four o'clock on Monday morning, Jan. 9, 1888, she passed from their temporary home in the village of Kirkwood, to her permanent home, "A house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens." The Master has said "Well done, come up higher," and she has entered into the joy of her Lord.

She leaves a devoted husband, three sons, a stepson, and a host of friends to mourn their loss.

First Day.

GALESBURG, ILL., SEPTEMBER 25, 1889.

The Thirty-Fourth annual session of the Central Illinois Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church convened in the First M. E. Church, Galesburg, Illinois, September 25, 1889, at 8:30 A. M., Bishop W. X. Ninde, D. D., presiding.

Sacramental Service.—The session was opened by the reading of eight verses of the 4th Chapter of the Second Epistle to Timothy. The 770th hymn was sung, after which the Bishop, assisted by the Presiding Elders and the Pastor of the Church, administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper to a large number of ministers and laymen.

Roll Call.—After some introductory remarks by the Bishop, the Secretary of the last Conference called the roll and 146 members and probationers answered to their names, (see roll) the following named being marked deceased: W. C. Cumming, Ahab Keller, John Morey, Francis Smith and W. J. Smith.

Secretaries.—On motion of J. G. Evans, Thomas Doney was elected Secretary by acclamation, and he was granted leave to nominate his own assistants. On motion of J. B. Dille, J. D. Calhoun was elected Statistical Secretary by acclamation and permitted to nominate his assistants.

Treasurer.—H. D. Clark was nominated Conference Treasurer and elected by acclamation and given liberty to nominate his assistants.

Assistant Secretaries.—The Secretary nominated Joe Bell and H. K. Metcalf his assistants and they were elected by acclamation.

Standing Committees.—On motion of J. W. Haney, the Presiding Elders were appointed a committee to nominate the Standing Committees.

They presented their report which was adopted. (See list of Standing Committees.)

Public Worship.—J. S. Cumming and G. J. Luckey were appointed committee on public worship.

Bar.—The bar of the Conference was fixed on a line with the fourth windows.

Assistant Statistical Secretaries.—On nomination of J. D. Calhoun, J. F. Robinson, D. S. McCown, Vincent Aten, J. E. Mercer, J. A. Riason and O. T. Dwinell, were elected as his assistants.

Conference Hours.—On motion of J. S. Cumming, the time of meeting was fixed at 8:30 A. M. and of adjourning at 11:45, the first half hour to be given to devotional exercises.

Introduced.—The following persons were introduced to the Conference: Dr. J. C. Hartzell, Secretary of the Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society; Dr. J. C. W. Coxe, Secretary of the Sunday School Union and Tract Society; John A. Edmondson, of the Central Tennessee Conference; J. A. H. Wilson, James McAllister and V. H. Brink, of the Southwest Kansas Conference; J. R. Wolf, of the Austin Conference; G. M. Kelley and S. P. Archer, of the West Virginia Conference, and Rev. John Hood, Pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, of Galesburg.

Gospel in All Lands.—W. H. Witter was appointed agent for the Gospel in All Lands.

The Secretary read a circular from the Book Committee on the Episcopal Fund which was referred to the Presiding Elders.

Papers from the American Sabbath Association were referred to the committee on Sanctity of the Sabbath.

The annual report of the Boston School of Theology was referred to the Committee on Education.

Conference Relations.—By vote the lists of the Superannuated and Supernumerary Preachers were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations, and all persons desiring a change of their relation were ordered to appear before that committee.

On motion of B. W. Baker, the Bishop and Presiding Elders were granted leave to refer any name to the same committee.

Leave of Absence was granted to L. McLean to attend a funeral, to A. M. Stocking, H. C. Birch and J. R. Jaques, Professors in Hedding

College, until Saturday, and to W. R. Carr after to-day for the remainder of the session.

The "**Christian Educator**" was referred to the Committee on Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society.

Ecumenical Conference Delegates.—On motion of R. Haney, the Presiding Elders were appointed a committee to nominate two ministers and two laymen to the Ecumenical Conference to be held in 1891.

On motion of G. J. Luckey, F. H. Cumming was appointed Conference Editor and Railroad Secretary.

The Twentieth Question was taken up and the name of M. A. Head, Presiding Elder of Rock Island District, was called. The Bishop stated that he had in his hands a bill of charges and specifications against Brother Head. On motion of J. S. Cumming, it was ordered that a Select Number of fifteen be appointed to try the case. On motion of G. R. Palmer, the Presiding Elders were directed to nominate the Select Number. The Conference appointed G. R. Palmer and R. B. Williams to represent the Church, and J. A. Souders, F. H. Cumming and G. W. Gue were recognized as counsel for the defense. The papers relating to the case were placed in the hands of the Secretary.

E. H. Erierson, of the Western Book Concern, was introduced and made a statement as to the place where the preachers might settle their accounts.

J. B. Dille was appointed by the Bishop to represent the Rock Island District in the cabinet.

Book Concern.—The summary of the report of the Book Concern was read by the Secretary and referred to the Committee on Book Accounts and Periodicals.

Dr. J. C. Hartzell addressed the Conference on our Educational Work in the South.

The report of the American Bible Society was referred to the Committee on Bible Cause.

On motion of H. K. Metcalf, the Committee on Blanks was directed to collect the reports.

Select Number.—The Committee on nominating the Select Number reported and on motion of J. W. Haney, the report was adopted. (See list.)

B. F. Tallman was appointed Chairman of the Select Number and the papers pertaining to the case were placed in his hands, and H. K. Metcalf was detailed as Secretary.

The reports of the Sunday School Union and Tract Society were referred to the appropriate Committee.

The list of the Standing Committees was read and their meetings announced.

On motion of R. Haney, the time was extended.

Leave of Absence was granted to C. W. Ayling.

On motion of B. W. Baker, O. T. Dwinell and J. R. Wolf were substituted for M. V. Crumbaker and F. W. Merrell on the Committee on Education.

J. D. Smith was substituted on the Board of Stewards for J. B. Dille.

Announcements were made, the Doxology was sung and the Benediction pronounced by Dr. Jaques.

Second Day.

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 26, 1889.

The Conference assembled at 8:30 A. M. with Bishop Ninde in the chair.

The devotional services were conducted by P. A. Cool.

The Journal of the previous day was read and approved.

The names of yesterday's absentees were called.

Transferred.—Telisphore Leveque was announced as transferred to the Northwest Indiana Conference.

Introduced.—The following persons were introduced to the Conference: E. G. Smith, Agent American Bible Society; J. B. Seymour and L. F. Baldwin, of the Illinois Conference.

Dr. J. C. W. Coxe addressed the Conference on the Work of the Sunday School Union and Tract Society.

Dr. Earl Cranston, of the Western Methodist Book Concern and John Burgess, of Iowa Conference, were introduced.

W. H. Hunter was substituted for W. G. Miller as Chairman of the Committee on State of the Church.

Note for Statistical Tables.

According to orders no cents appear in these columns; hence some charges will be reported fractions of dollars less than they paid. But, where the Secretary was able, he added these fractions together, and gave credit for a dollar. For example, where report said \$30.30 for missions from Churches, and \$10.70 from Sunday School, the Church will be credited with \$51.00, or the Sunday School with \$11.00, so that the total will balance. So where report read S. S. Union \$2.50, and Tracts \$2.50, it will frequently appear that one of these is reported \$3.00 and the other \$2.00, so that the charge would have all the credit possible.

REPORTS.

EDUCATION.

Your Committee submits the following report:

GRAND PRAIRIE SEMINARY.

This Institution closed in June last, the most prosperous year of its history, both as to the number of students and the improvements. There were 256 students in the winter term, an increase of 40 over the corresponding term the preceding year. The Ladies' Hall, in process of construction at last Conference, has been completed at a cost of \$11,000, of which about \$7,000 have been paid. The Literary Faculty remains the same, but in Music and Elocution teachers have been secured from the New England Conservatory, and the Northwestern Conservatory, and Prof. R. L. Cumnoek's School of Elocution. The fall term exceeds all previous ones in the number of students enrolled. We recommend as Visitors, Revs. L. F. Cullom, R. B. Williams, W. R. Warner, E. G. Cattermole, E. Wasmuth. Also we recommend the appointment of Dr. McClish as President, and Rev. C. E. Pickett as Instructor.

HEDDING COLLEGE.

The Trustees of Hedding College report a fairly prosperous year. Although the attendance was not so large as the preceding year, and a deficit of \$2,000 in running expenses resulting therefrom, we are glad to note that the work done, both by faculty and students, has been of most excellent character and entirely satisfactory to all concerned. The fall term opens with an increased attendance over the same term of last year and favorable prospect for a healthy growth during the present year. We note with great hopefulness the inauguration of a plan by the Trustees to raise an endowment fund of \$50,000 by January 1st, 1895, of which \$19,000 is already secured. The work of Hedding College has been a great blessing to the Church in Western Illinois. The College is well located in a city noted for its good morals and the absence of saloons and other places of evil influences. Methodism in Western Illinois needs this College and we earnestly recommend our people to co-operate with the Trustees in their efforts to endow the Institution. We congratulate the Trustees in obtaining a man of such ability as Rev. J. G. Evans, D. D., LL. D., and we recommend his appointment as President. As Trustees to take the place of those whose term expires in the year 1889, we concur with the Board in recommending the following: Revs.

R. G. Pearce, G. W. Gue, J. S. Cumming, G. J. Luckey and Thos. Newell, J. B. Smith, H. D. Earl, W. H. McCord. We also recommend as Visitors, Revs. John Rogers, W. B. Shoop, Geo. D. Hensell, R. A. Brown, H. J. Boatman, W. R. Wiley. We also recommend the appointment as Professors, Revs. J. R. Jaques, D. D., Ph. D., A. M. Stocking, A. M., and H. C. Birch, A. M.

ILLINOIS WESLEYAN UNIVERSITY.

We rejoice in the success which has attended the administration of Dr. Wilder during the past year, and are grateful for the present propitious outlook for the Institution. We appreciate the generous offer of Dr. Hiram Buck, of the Illinois Conference, to give to the University \$12,500, conditioned on the raising of \$50,000. The Executive Committee, to whom the matter was referred by the joint board, having requested the appointment of Rev. B. W. Baker as Financial Agent, we heartily concur in the recommendation.

We recommend for election as Trustees, H. D. Clark, G. R. Palmer, J. H. Bunn and J. H. Wilkinson, and as Visitors, C. O. McCulloch, R. Crewes, T. W. McVety, M. V. B. White, F. H. Cumming and T. Doney.

NORTHWESTERN UNIVERSITY.

The Trustees of the Northwestern University report this great Institution as being in a very healthy condition, increasing in its patronage and facilities for education in all the departments of the University. Special mention should be made of the completion of the J. B. Hobbs Astronomical Observatory, containing the great Dearborn Telescope, and the very latest improvements in all its appliances. We recommend Dr. E. McClish of Trustee.

THEOLOGICAL SCHOOLS.

We recommend to young men looking to the work of the Ministry to seek special preparation in our Schools of Theology, and to prepare for their Seminary work by a full College course.

Those desiring information concerning De Pauw School of Theology, are invited to correspond with the Dean at Greencastle, Indiana. We recommend as Visitors, C. O. McCulloch and C. Hancy.

The Boston School of Theology is at No. 72 Mt. Vernon Street, Boston, Mass.

GARRETT BIBLICAL INSTITUTE.

The rapid increase in attendance at our Schools of Theology is very significant. Garrett enrolled last year 167 students, attaining the rank of second or third among all similar institutions of the land. This School is thoroughly equipped with buildings and libraries, and the Conference Visitors report that the examinations bear evidence of most thorough work. The Faculty is unsurpassed, having in it men who are not only skilled instructors, but who are also widely known as among the leading thinkers and best Biblical scholars of the day.

STATE OF THE CHURCH.

Your Committee on the State of the Church beg leave to make the following report:

We record our profound gratitude to The Great Head of the Church for the marked spiritual and material prosperity of Methodism the past year within our borders.

Throughout our Conference the revival spirit has been manifest, resulting in the accession of hundreds and thousands to the Church, our centers of learning sharing largely in the gracious outpouring, evidencing that *spiritual* and *intellectual* advancement and development keep pace with each other. This is as it should be. It is a matter of no little satisfaction that the number of those attending our Seminaries of learning who enter the ministry is on the increase, justifying the expectation that the pulpit of the near future will become better equipped for its responsible calling than ever before.

In our material prosperity we have equal cause for thanksgiving. A number of Churches and parsonages built and others rehabilitated and beautified, are unmistakable evidences of substantial advancement, and this, not confined to a few localities, but extending generally throughout our borders, showing most conclusively that the aggressive spirit of Methodism has not diminished a whit.

An additional reason for gratitude is found in the greatly increased appropriation made by our Book Concern in this, its Centennial year, for the benefit of our old heroes in the ministry, who laid the foundations of Methodism and of good government in the pioneer days of the Republic, and for the prospect that through the continued wise, diligent management of this heaven-favored enterprise, the amount will be increased from year to year. It most certainly can and will be done if the Church will but patronize in a reasonable degree her own publishing

interests, which she will not fail to do when she intelligently appreciates them. What more deserved good can the Church do than to provide bountifully for her disabled ministers when retired from effective work? It would tarnish her honor if she did not let every needed provision possible be made to accomplish so desirable an end.

While it is a matter of supreme congratulation that our Church occupies an advanced position on all reforms that command the attention of the people and promise the elevation and ennoblement of humanity, there are some things that call for regret if not rebuke. Forms of popular dissipation that seriously antagonize the Kingdom of God—base ball, card playing, dancing, patronizing the circus and the theater, which should be discarded and avoided by all professing godliness as out of harmony with the word of God, which says: "Come out from among them, and be ye separate." Also, the habit of Church members giving too much of their time and attention to the "Lodge" to the neglect of their Church duties as means of grace. The "Lodge" may have its place, but to the Christian, the Church and its obligations should be supreme. Holding as we do, the profoundest respect and veneration for our Episcopal form of Church government, we would deprecate the existence of any spirit among our ministers which would have a tendency to hinder or mar its full and legitimate operation, especially that spirit which would cause a minister to feel or think because he does not get a first grade appointment every time, that he is depreciated thereby and losing his rank and standing as an efficient and acceptable preacher, or that that fact dates the beginning of his ministerial decadence. But, instead, the spirit that is willing to share the less desirable places with his equally deserving and equally competent brethren, and thereby exemplify that golden precept of the Apostle which counsels that "in honor" we should "prefer one another." May this latter spirit gain new life among us. Let us rather encourage that spirit of godly ambition to be self-sacrificing, and which discourages undue self-seeking. We shall hail with gladness the day when all unnecessary friction between employer and employe shall be fully adjusted upon the principle of the "Golden Rule" in the gospel: "As ye would that men should do unto you, do ye even so unto them." It is the duty of the Church in and through her membership, as well as her ministry, to do all in her power, both by precept and example, to hasten this much desired result.

Recognizing the Press as a potent factor in the education of the people, we would encourage the extensive circulation of our Methodist literature among our people. Believing that the great conflict between Truth and Error is to be waged largely through the Press, we advise the use of our books and periodicals, both in our Sunday Schools and in our homes. We believe this to be the most effective means of securing the disuse of questionable and pernicious kinds of literature and meeting the pressing need of a better knowledge of our usages and doctrines. Let every pastor do his duty in this direction and corresponding results will most surely follow.

With pleasure we note the increasing attention which is being given to the social meetings of our Church. With the needed revival of our Prayer and Class Meetings will come a general revival throughout the Church, which will lead to the salvation of souls. By special preparation for, and proper conduct of these meetings, the pastor will secure a constantly increasing attendance, and make this work of the Church a most fruitful source of good to all.

Finally we point with just pride to the marked interest taken in the intellectual, benevolent and spiritual development of the young people of our Church.

We rejoice that through a spirit of godly harmony and denominational loyalty, the several Young Peoples' Societies of our Church have been, by competent authority, consolidated into one, the "Epworth League," and placed under the watchful care and control of the Church, than which no greater and more helpful agency for the development of young workers in the Church can be found. It seeks the fourfold work of the original "Oxford Club," founded by the Wesleys, demands no new machinery, but calls into operation the already existing appliances of the Church, and renders them effective. It seeks to utilize every available force as well as to promote the highest culture both of heart and head.

We most earnestly recommend the organization of an Epworth League in every Church within the bounds of our Conference.

Your Committee recommend the adoption of the following:

Resolved. That a Committee of five (5) be appointed by our Conference at this session to take into consideration the propriety of organizing this Conference into a "Mutual Insurance Company" for the purpose of insuring our Church property within the bounds of our Conference, so as to save thousands of dollars to our Church in the item of Church property insurance, and that said Committee be instructed to report at our next Annual Session. FREEDMEN'S AID AND SOUTHERN EDUCATION.

We recognize one of the most potent factors in the perpetuity of our national government to be the enlightenment and education of her people. It is the great object of the Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society to develop the intellectual and moral faculties of the colored and poor white people in the South.

We rejoice in the great prosperity which has attended the efforts of the Church through this agency in this God-given work.

We have forty-three institutions of learning in the Southern States. Of these, twelve are of collegiate grade, three among the white people and nine among the colored people. The remainder are of academic grade, about equally divided between the races. Nearly two hundred and fifty teachers are employed, and over seven thousand students attended these schools last year, paying \$38,485.00 for tuition and room rent.

The Southern Conferences gave in collections for this cause last year, \$10,863.00. These facts are very encouraging; therefore

Resolved, That we will give this Society our hearty support and will do our utmost to raise the \$4,100.00 apportioned to our Conference by the Board of Managers.

We fully believe that the money thus secured for the great work of saving heathen women has no real tendency to decrease the general missionary collection, but rather to increase it by bringing our churches into closer sympathy with the Master's plan to disciple all nations.

Resolved, That the Presiding Elders of this Conference be requested to see that this provision of the Discipline for a *pro rata* division of all funds raised for Ministerial support is carried out.

4th. That we will by an earnest canvass, endeavor to put the *North-western Christian Advocate* into every Methodist home, that we heartily commend the work of its editor, Dr. Edwards, especially in his heroic assaults against the satanic "triangle," rum, Romanism and race prejudice.

5th. That we have learned with pleasure that many of the charges under the leadership of their pastors have celebrated the Centennial and Semi-Centennial anniversaries of our Book Concern by public service, setting before the people the facts relating to the growth and prosperity of our publishing interests, and would urge those who have not as yet held such services to respond to the call of the Church in this matter as soon as possible.

6th. That we recognize *Our Youth*, the official organ of the Epworth League, as a periodical ably conducted, instructive in its spirit and tone, and admirably adapted to the needs of our young people, begetting within them both love and loyalty to the doctrines and polity of our Church, and is deserving of a place in every Methodist home.

7th. That the *Gospel in All Lands*, the official organ of the Missionary Society, should be brought to the attention of our people and urged upon their consideration.

8th. That we as pastors pledge ourselves to use and advise the use of only Methodist literature in our Sunday Schools.

And we are satisfied that in the Epworth League the demands of the Church for an organization in which the highest spiritual and intellectual interests of her young people will be cared for, are met, and in which young Methodist influence can be made most effective.

But we realize that organizations are not automatic, and the Epworth League will be no exception to this rule. We therefore urge that each one do his part in his place in making it a success.

Let the District Leagues in their capacity, take oversight of their territory, and use every available means to have their respective districts organized.

Let the Presiding Elders feel under obligations to watch the interests of the League, and to make it a part of their Quarterly Conference inquiries. Above all, we, as individual pastors will as a part of our pastoral duty, do our best to establish an organization in each of our charges, auxiliary to the Presiding Elder District and General Conference District Leagues.

We recommend the holding of an anniversary of the Epworth League at the session of the Annual Conference in connection with the Sunday School and Tract Societies, or a special anniversary if possible.

As the Constitution of the Seventh General Conference District Epworth League provides for the election of one member of each Annual Conference to represent the Conference on the Board of Control of the Seventh General Conference District League, we recommend the election of Rev. TEMPERANCE AND CONSTITUTIONAL PROHIBITION.

Your Committee would beg leave to report as follows:

1. We reaffirm the utterances on total abstinence and on the suppression of the liquor traffic by constitutional and statutory enactments, heretofore made by this Conference.
2. We recognize clearly that opposition to constitutional prohibition on the part of the liquor traffic of this country is growing more intense every hour; that its political power is alarmingly dominant, and that a strong disposition is manifest in many quarters to compromise with the evil.
3. The fact confronts us that this terrible and threatening foe will never beat a retreat in the face of a policy of mere words.
4. The nearer the final battle comes on, the stronger becomes the manifest disposition to repress agitation from the pulpit for the sake of

peace, especially all reference to the saloon as a political influence, as it refers to voting against men whose legislative actions are subservient to the saloon power.

5. We regard all doubtful and half-hearted action in opposition to this evil as directly strengthening to the hands of our foes, and weakening to the courage of the Church of God.

6. We thoroughly believe all legislation in regard to the liquor traffic should express moral conviction as to the character of the business, therefore we condemn all compromise measures of license and local option; therefore

Resolved, 1st. That political parties admitting the morals of the people and the protection of the homes to be the first concern of good government, and then offering no adequate protection from the accursed ravages of the rum traffic, are unworthy the support of Christian people.

Resolved, 2d. That the times demand the most resolute and fearless denunciation from all our pulpits, of the recent and present efforts to saddle high license upon the nation as a wise and righteous adjustment of this issue, whereas it is indeed a stupendous moral failure.

Resolved, 3d. That we hail with joy the recent vigorous efforts at Sunday closing in our large cities, and heartily commend the course of the *Chicago Daily News* in its noble work toward that end.

Resolved, 4th. That we endorse and encourage the work of the W. C. T. U. in their earnest efforts to promote the cause of temperance, and we recommend the course of study in scientific and economic temperance. REV. JOHN MOREY.

John Morey was born in Lincolnville, Hancock County, Maine, Aug. 28, 1802. His parents were deeply pious members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, both of them converted under the ministry of Bishop Joshua Soule. As a result of their religious instruction and godly influence he was converted when a little boy.

When he was twelve years of age they moved into Oneida county, N. Y., where, religious privileges being few, he suffered much loss in his Christian experience. But hearing of a two-day's meeting at a long distance from his home, he attended, and "the Lord poured upon him the baptism of his spirit, so that he was filled with rejoicing."

At twenty he began to exhort in the meetings which were held in private houses, and as a result about forty of his neighbors were converted. This led him to feel that God had a work for him to do as a preacher of the gospel, and his brethren in the Church were impressed with the same conviction. So appointments were made, and he, though young, timid and uneducated, stood before the people declaring the truth, and showing not only "aptness to teach," but unusual skill in argument.

On the 22d of May, 1834, the Quarterly Conference of Westmoreland Circuit gave him license to preach, which was signed by Rev. Daniel Barnes, Presiding Elder. For some years he labored as a local preacher, and being of ardent temperament, and seeing the worth and peril of souls out of Christ, he labored with great zeal, and many were saved through his instrumentality. In 1834 he yielded to his own deep convictions and the persuasion of his brethren, and consented to enter the regular ministry, and at the Ohio Conference, held that year in Circleville, Ohio, by Bishop Soule, he was ordained Deacon and admitted on trial, and appointed to Wellington Circuit in the Mt. Vernon District, John H. Powers, Presiding Elder. The Circuit was large, consisting of twenty-four appointments, requiring three hundred miles of travel on horseback, each round through dense forests, with bridle-paths blazed by the woodman's axe. During the two years that he remained on this Circuit he traveled over seven thousand miles, and preached nearly seven hundred times, and had two hundred and fifty-two conversions.

In 1837 the Conference was divided and he fell into the North Ohio Conference and was appointed to Vermilion Circuit. There was much opposition from Mormonism and other heresies, but he was true to his ordination vow, "with all faithful diligence to banish and drive away all erroneous and strange doctrines contrary to God's word." He continued for two years, and there were three hundred and fifty conversions and additions to the Church.

In 1839 he was transferred to the Illinois Conference, and at the next session, held in Springfield, in the fall of 1840, by Bishop Soule, he was appointed to Macomb Circuit, with nineteen appointments. Mormonism was at that time exerting a baneful influence in all that part of our state, but the heroic defender of the faith resisted this wild fanaticism and had a year of triumph.

In 1841 he was appointed to Knoxville Circuit, and after a very pleasant year, in 1842 he was sent to Canton Circuit. That year the Millerite excitement prevailed, and in some parts of the Circuit the public mind was wrought into a frenzy. Here he found use for his powers of controversy, and by preaching and lecturing he saved the Church from being carried away with this wild heresy. On the division of the Conference he fell into the Rock River Conference.

In 1844 he was appointed to Berwick and Monmouth Circuit, with R. Haney, Presiding Elder. It being a rainy season and there being a rank growth of vegetation, there was much sickness, and his health failed, so that at the end of the year, during which he had success in his labors, the hard-worked itinerant asked a Superannuated relation to the Conference, which was granted.

In 1846 he was appointed Presiding Elder of Washington District, with nine charges. He continued on the District two years and much good was accomplished. During this time the work began among the Swedes within the bounds of La Fayette Circuit, under the labors of Jonas J. Hedstrom, a Local Deacon, and under the supervision of the Presiding Elder a Mission was formally organized, with headquarters at Bishop Hill. This work has grown until a great Conference is the result, with lines of religious influence reaching out through several States, and penetrating the most distant parts of Scandinavia. It is safe to say that Elder Morey, like others of the fathers, "built more wisely than he knew," and never dreamed of the vast importance of the work he did.

In 1848 he was appointed to Knoxville District, having the following charges: Knoxville, Mercer, Monmouth, Lewistown, Oquawka, Centerville, Macomb, Marietta, Canton, Nauvoo and Carthage. He remained on the District two years. The Mormon troubles were at their height, and cannot be fully appreciated by those who were never on the ground, and it required great wisdom and energy to guide the Church safely through those stormy times.

In 1850, his health having again failed, he was Superannuated for a year. In 1851 he was appointed to New Boston Circuit. In 1852 he was pastor of Rock Island Station. During that year, on the 22d of March, 1853, the gifted, eloquent and saintly Presiding Elder of the Rock Island District, Asahel E. Phelps, in the midst of great usefulness and toils, "fell asleep in Jesus," leaving a precious memory, which has filled the land with its fragrance.

In 1853 Elder Morey was appointed to La Fayette Circuit, with George Reach as his colleague, and John Luccock, Presiding Elder. Remaining two years upon the charge among old friends, and having several hundred conversions, he declared them among the most pleasant and useful of his life.

In 1855 he was appointed to Peru District, including Peru, Lasalle, Henry, Whitefield, Wethersfield, Sheffield, Annawan, Tiskilwa, Middleport, Ash Grove, Mazon, Avoca, Reading and Ottawa. This District was large and laborious, traveled by private conveyance, and reaching from the neighborhood of Rock Island to the Indiana State line, and embracing nearly all of the eastern part of what is now the Central Illinois Conference.

In 1856 the Rock River Conference was divided, and the Peoria (now Central Illinois) Conference, organized. This divided the Peru District, and at the Conference held in Peoria September 10th, 1856, by Bishop Jones, Elder Morey was appointed to the Kewanee District. At the close of his second year, the District was divided, and he remained two years more upon that part which was called Toulon District.

In 1860 he was again Superannuated. In 1861 he was Presiding Elder of Monmouth District. In 1862 he was appointed to Abingdon Circuit. In 1863-4 he was sent to Avon Circuit, and in 1865 he was Superannuated, which relation he sustained till death.

After his Superannuation he lived one year in Abingdon, then three years in Rock Island, then removed to Gilroy, California, where he lived

six years. In 1885 he went to San Jose, California, where he resided with his daughter, Mrs. H. M. Clark, until he closed his life.

He was two years of his life, an Exhorter, five years a Local Preacher, a Circuit Preacher seventeen years, a Stationed Preacher one year, Presiding Elder ten years, and a Superannuate twenty-six years. In 1856 he was a delegate from the Rock River Conference to the General Conference, which met in Indianapolis.

In person he was tall and slightly stooped, with projecting eyebrows, giving the appearance of a receding forehead. He was grave without severity, warm-hearted and abiding in friendship, a man of marked integrity and deep piety. As a speaker he was rapid, yet easily understood. As a preacher he was philosophical, and as a result of the circumstances of his early ministry, controversial. While severely logical and mighty in argument, there was a pathos that moved the hearts of his hearers. He was a man of princely power in prayer. Above all he had that peculiar yet absolutely necessary gift for the Christian minister—the unction of the Holy Spirit.

From the time of his wife's death, January 21, 1887, he longed for his departure, often speaking tenderly of her, and with chastened sorrow yearned to greet her in the heavenly world. By an accident on Thursday, September 19th, his hip was crushed, and he lingered in great suffering until a few minutes past midnight the following Saturday, when, just three days before the Conference met in Kankakee, he entered into rest. The end was peaceful. His last words were, "Blessed Jesus, take me home."

Another of the fathers has gone up to join the great majority before the throne. Of him it may be said, as it was said of Barnabas, "He was a good man, and full of the Holy Ghost and of faith; and much people was added unto the Lord."

REV. FRANCIS SMITH.

Rev. Francis Smith was born February 11, 1822, in Larn County, Ky., not more than a mile from where Abraham Lincoln was born. He died at his home near Lexington, Ill., January 3, 1889. He was converted at a camp meeting held by Jonathan Stamps, on the old Yankee Street Camp Ground. He came to Illinois with his parents in 1840, was licensed to exhort in 1842 by William Royal, and to preach by A. E. Phelps in 1843. He joined the Illinois Conference the same fall and continued in the work for forty-five years, as an effective preacher for forty years. In 1882 he superannuated, but after that served as a supply on Noah's Creek Circuit one year, and the White Oak appointment of Hudson Circuit one year; and apparently with renewed health and vigor he entered upon his work at Roanoke last October, saying he never felt better in his life. About the middle of November his health broke, and he failed rapidly till the end came. It was a beautiful ending of a life of much toil and sincere discipleship.

Mr. Smith was united in marriage in 1848 to Adelia Ann Hall, while on the Lancaster Circuit in Wisconsin. The union was blessed with fourteen children, four of whom, with the faithful mother, are left to mourn, but not without hope.

When the Illinois Conference was divided, in 1844, Bro. Smith fell into the Rock River Division, and when the Rock River was divided, in 1848, he fell into the Wisconsin Division. In 1850 he transferred to the Rock River, and when it was again divided in 1856 he fell into the Peoria Division, called, after 1860, Central Illinois Conference.

He served the following appointments: Mercer Circuit, Illinois Conference, 1843-44; Crow Meadow Circuit, 1844-45; Lacon, 1845-46; Madison Mission, 1846-47; Lancaster and Potosi, 1847-48, in Wisconsin, Rock River Conference; Hazel Green Circuit, 1849-50, in the Wisconsin Conference; Groveland Circuit, 1850-52; Henry, 1852-54; Brimfield in 1854-56, Rock River Conference; LaSalle, 1856-58; Washington District, 1858-62, in the Peoria Conference, the name being changed to Central Illinois Conference in 1860; Monmouth District, 1862-66; Abingdon charge, 1866-67; Aledo, 1867-69; Union and Towanda, 1869-71; Selma Circuit, 1871-74; Brimfield, 1874-77; Kirkwood, 1877-80; Gilson, 1880-82, Central Illinois Conference, so completing an unbroken forty years of effective itineracy, and then remained with us a little more than six years as a Superannuate.

Bro. Smith was an incisive doctrinal preacher, well posted in Methodist doctrines, of which he was a champion during the controversial period. He conducted several debates to the satisfaction of his brethren, and is remembered by the younger members of the Conference with John Luccock, A. E. Phelps and William Underwood, as a defender of the faith. Even after he superannuated, in 1886, he held a debate at Cuba, Ill., with a Campbellite preacher, and with profit to our church.

Bro. Smith was not only an incisive and doctrinal preacher, he was also a revival preacher. Revival attended his labors in nearly every charge he served. His greatest revivals were at Lancaster and Potosi, Hazel Green, Brimfield, Abingdon and Union. He was a very sincere, sociable man, full of instruction and a devoted pastor. He looked carefully after the details of his work on all lines, and so was not only a good preacher, but one of the kind of whom we say: "He is a good all-round man." After he superannuated he was a leader among his brethren in the pew, and very helpful to the pastor. He was one Superannuate in whom his brethren delighted. For forty-nine years he was a faithful disciple, and for forty years an effective Itinerant. His life was full of labors. Of him it may be said: Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord.

Servant of God well done;
Thy glorious warfare's past,
The battle's fought, the race is won,
And thou art crowned at last.

WILLIAM JEFFERSON SMITH.

William Jefferson Smith, the subject of this memoir, was born in Eastern Tennessee, May 30th, 1820. At nine years of age, with his parents, he moved to Indiana, and in 1835 they moved to Joliet, Ill., where he grew to manhood.

In 1843, while the Methodists were holding a revival meeting, he was happily converted to God. The work of grace in his soul was thorough and instantaneous, and with it at once came the call to "go work in My vineyard." He joined the Methodist Church as a probationer, and was soon after appointed class leader by the pastor, and a few months later the church gave him license to exhort.

He was married June 19th, 1845, to Miss Lydia Harrington, of Joliet, Ill., who, in all his ministry, from the beginning to the end, was all that a Christian minister's wife could be. Full of the spirit of self-denial, patiently and without murmuring moving from place to place, wherever the Bishop thought best to send them.

He was licensed to preach June 3d, 1848, and in the following September was received on trial in the Rock River Annual Conference. His first appointment was the Aurora Circuit, with Boyd Lowe as preacher in charge. It was a blessed revival year, the number of converts reaching up into the hundreds. From thence forward, Rev. W. J. Smith was a successful evangelist. His appointment to a charge was almost a sure indication of a blessed revival. His greatest ambition was to lead souls to Christ. He was not what we are disposed to call a great preacher, full of rhetoric and burning eloquence and oratory; and yet, in the midst of his revival work, he would become so anointed with the Holy Ghost that his words burned like fire, and the congregation would weep and melt under the Holy Spirit's eloquence until the sobs could be heard all over the house. He was not a boisterous man, never raising his voice to an unpleasant key, and yet he was exceedingly earnest in his preaching. He depended not on any form of human eloquence or wisdom. The gospel he preached, like that of the apostle Paul, was in the demonstration of the spirit and of power.

In 1849 Bro. Smith was appointed to Sugar River Circuit, and, although in poor health, he was honored of God in the salvation of many precious souls, and also in other lines of church work, for he was most thorough in every department of work, especially pastoral visiting and improving church property. At the Conference of 1850 he was ordained a Deacon in the Church of God by Bishop Hamlin, and appointed to what we now love to call the Old Marietta Circuit. This was a very laborious work, but under God he was more successful in that field of labor, and greater results came out of it than any other charge ever assigned him. He received into the church, during the two years of his ministry there, 295 converts. Among these we have the names of Rev. Dr. G. R. Palmer and A. R. Morgan, of this Conference; Rev. Wm. J. Beck, of the Des Moines (Iowa) Conference; Rev. Stephen Brink, of the South-western Kansas Conference; James Rutledge and G. M. Morey, all of whom have been active, successful and faithful ministers of the Gospel.

At the Conference of 1852 he was ordained an Elder in the Church of God, and appointed to the Macomb Circuit, where he had his usual success in winning souls, and at Conference he reported an increase of 150 to the church. In 1852 the Bishop appointed him to the Kainsville Circuit, where he labored hard, but, for unknown reasons, without success. He always looked upon his work there as a failure.

In 1855 the Rock River Conference, which included all the north half of the State of Illinois, was divided, making two Conferences out of the territory, viz.: Rock River and Peoria, now the Central Illinois Conference. Bro. Smith by his own request was appointed to the Sheffield charge, in the bounds of the Peoria Conference.

Here he succeeded in building two new churches, organizing several new societies, and adding many to the church. In 1856 he was appointed to the Victoria Circuit, where he remained two years, and where the revival spirit continued to manifest itself, taking into the church over two hundred members, erecting a fine church building and a comfortable parsonage. At the Conference of 1858 he was appointed to the Wyoming Circuit with J. J. Fleharty, of blessed memory, as junior preacher. Here again churches were built and repaired and the usual revival results followed his labors. One hundred and fifty were converted, and two of the converts, Bros. C. H. Braee and James Ferris, became ministers of the Gospel and members of the Central Illinois Conference.

In 1859 he was returned for a second year to Wyoming with George W. Gue as junior preacher, and I look back to the labors of that year with the greatest satisfaction and rejoice that I was permitted to commence my ministry under the influence and guiding hand of that man of God, and whatever success has attended my labors has under God been largely due to that consecrated and holy man. In 1860 Bro. Smith was appointed to the LaFayette and Toulon work, the same good results following; 160 additions to the church, also a new parsonage and house of worship built.

In 1862 the Bishop stationed him at Oneida, where he was blessed in his efforts to save souls, and built for those times a very fine church. In 1864 he was appointed to the Woodhull charge, and in the two years he was there added 150 souls to the church and built two houses of worship. While on this charge he received a paralytic stroke from which he never fully recovered. At the Conference of 1866 he laid aside his armor, fully conscious of the fact that his work was nearly finished. He took a superannuated relation to the Conference, and in the right spirit retired from the active ministry.

In 1870 he rallied and tried once more to enter the work, but while the spirit was willing the flesh was weak. He remained on the superannuated list in this Conference twenty-three years, and the 13th of last May God called him to receive his crown.

Just before he died his son asked him how it was with him. He tried to speak or in some way express himself, but he was too weak. His countenance, however, lighted up with a heavenly smile, and his son

said: "I would not for anything have failed to see that smile on father's face just as the spirit went away to its heavenly home." May it not be that God was letting him take a view of the heavenly world and friends gone before.

Over one thousand souls were brought into the fold under his labors, and we as ministers and people are reaping the benefits of his work. "He rests from his labors and his works follow him."

REV. AHAB KELLAR.

Rev. Ahab Kellar died in Princeville, Illinois, June 1, 1889. He was born in Monongalia county, West Virginia, Nov. 18, 1804; was converted and united with the M. E. Church when about eighteen. This step displeasing his father, he moved to Beaver, Pa., where he worked as a ship carpenter. He was licensed to preach in 1828; was very useful and successful. In 1832 he was received on trial in Pittsburg Conference. His first appointment was to New Castle Circuit, a large and laborious charge, calling for preaching about thirty times every four weeks. Here this writer first met him, and heard him preach in the old log meeting house, with the venerable Father Carman as leader of a small class. On that memorable night the word came in demonstration of the Spirit and in power, and the weeping, sobbing multitude felt that God was present. Having entered upon his life-work, he pursued it with a steady hand for fifty-seven years. He never lost the holy fire kindled at conversion. Experimental religion was his theme. There was a peculiar unction attending his ministry, and God put great honor on his labors in the conversion of hundreds of precious souls. It would be interesting to follow him through all the fields served by him in the Pittsburg, Erie, and Central Illinois Conferences, and hear him tell the stories of the gospel victories, but our space will not allow. He was a loyal Methodist, believing in the doctrines, usages and discipline of his church; he was an ardent lover of the itinerant ministry, and rejoiced in the privilege of sharing its sacrifices and toils. He was a plain, modest man, retiring in manner, never pushing himself for choice appointments or easy fields of labor. He did cheerfully the work assigned him by the authorities of the Church, and was always happy in that work. He was a man of general reading, and had a large store of useful knowledge. He was well instructed in the holy Scriptures; a diligent student of Clark, Fletcher and Watson, and in his hands the trumpet of the gospel gave no uncertain sound on the doctrines of Methodist theology. The camp meeting was to him a Bethel. I have seen him on such occasions among the King's enemies "terrible as an army with banners," always at the front charging on the works of the enemy. He was a good man, full of faith and the Holy Ghost, and many were added to the Lord who will hail him as instrumental in leading them to heaven.

He was a true friend, one who could be trusted—open, generous, and manly in all his intercourse with his brethren. In his domestic relations he was most fortunate in the selection of the partner of his youth.

Married to an elect lady, consecrated to the service of God, she proved an efficient helper in his ministry. She was neat, chaste, discreet, keeping at home, and caring for and training their children for God. I do not wonder, as the end drew nigh, that he said: "If it be consistent, bury me by the side of mother, at Altona." He was a faithful husband, and affectionate father. To his family and Conference he left a priceless legacy—an unsullied character. For fifty-seven years the question has been answered, "Nothing against Bro. Kellar."

His last sickness was somewhat protracted, and his sufferings severe. All that affectionate children and kind friends could do to alleviate his pain was freely given. Visiting him in company with Rev. Mr. Tullis, and engaging in prayer, I said: "Tell me, Bro. Kellar, how does it look on the other side?" With holy fire flashing from his eyes, and glory beaming in his countenance, he responded with emphasis: "All right! all right! all right!"

The funeral services were held early in the morning of June 3rd, at Princeville, conducted by Rev. W. H. Hunter, who made remarks from Ps. xvii. 15, assisted by Rev. P. A. Cool and Rev. A. Smith, in the presence of a large company of sympathizing friends. At Altona, the former home of the family, a large company of sorrowing friends followed the precious dust to the beautiful cemetery, where Rev. R. Haney read the impressive burial service, and amid tears and holy songs, all that is mortal of this noble man of God was laid down to rest till the heavens be no more. Revs. Haney and Dille made appropriate remarks.

He was admitted to the Pittsburg Conference in 1832 and appointed to New Castle as colleague with D. Ritchie; in 1833, to Franklin as colleague with R. B. Gardiner; in 1834, admitted to full connection, ordained Deacon and stationed at Brookville, one to be supplied. In 1835, Centerville, colleague with J. W. Davis; in 1836 Conference ordained him Elder at Salem, colleague, C. Best; 1837, Salem; 1838, Clarksville; 1839, Greenville and Clarksville, colleague, John Crum; 1840, Cambridge; 1841, Cambridge, colleague, J. E. Bassett; 1842, Seagertown, colleague, J. Mortimore; 1843, Parkman, colleagues, G. Stoddard and Albert Norton; 1844, Parkman, colleague, George W. Maltby; 1845, Edinburg, colleague, Israel Mershon; 1846, Edinburg, colleague, Thomas Subbs; 1847, Hubbard, colleague, S. Hubbard; 1848, Hubbard, colleague, Hiram Kellogg; 1849, Hartford, colleague, James B. Hammond; 1850, Curlsville, colleague, John R. Lyon; 1851, Curlsville, colleague, J. Whippo; 1852, Hendersonville, colleague, Parker P. Sherwood; 1853, Hendersonville, colleague, J. H. Vance; 1854, Cooperstown, one to be supplied.

In 1855, Peoria Conference appointed him to Magnolia, colleague, C. A. Stine; 1856, Magnolia, colleague, B. E. Kaufman; 1857, Lacon; 1858-9, Groveland; 1860, I have no minutes; 1861, Princeville; 1862, Brimfield and Kickapoo; 1863, Kickapoo; 1864, Smithville; 1865-6, Mount Hedding; 1867-8, La Prairie Center; 1869, Wethersfield; 1870-1, Victoria; 1872, Zion; 1873, Zion and Atkinson, colleague, J. P. Coffman; 1874, North Henderson, colleague, M. Smith; 1875, Ionia; 1876, Wataga; 1877, Superannuated—supplied; 1879, Reading; 1882, Elmore.

REV. WM. C. CUMMING.

Rev. Wm. C. Cumming was born in Rockbridge County, Virginia, January 22, 1799. About the year 1810 his parents removed to Blount County, East Tennessee. He was the son of Christian parents, who were devoted members of the Presbyterian Church. In the year 1820 he found peace with God, and became a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church. A few months later he was recognized as an exhorter, after the manner of the Methodism of those days. In 1822, on the 4th day of October, he was granted license to preach the Gospel, and on the 29th day of the same month he started to his first appointment, the Sequachy Valley Circuit. This was the beginning of a marvelous record, covering a period of nearly half a century of sacrifice, toil and victory. In the record kept on high there is not a single tear or heart throb without our Father's notice.

But here the writings must be but brief at best. In 1822 and 1823 he traveled the Sequachy Valley Circuit; 1824 the Lee Circuit. November 24 of this year he was ordained deacon at Knoxville, East Tennessee, by Bishop Roberts; 1825, New River; 1826, Jonesboro Circuit. In the fall of this year he was ordained Elder in Abingdon, Va., by Bishop Joshua Soule. 1827, the French Broad Circuit, in North Carolina; 1828, Lebanon Circuit; 1829, New River Circuit. August 25, 1829, he was married to Miss Maria Patton. 1830, the Tazewell Circuit; 1831, Carter Valley Circuit; 1832-33, the Abingdon Circuit, Virginia; 1834, the Blountville Circuit.

In October, 1834, he started for the Illinois Conference, and in October, 1835, was readmitted to the traveling connection by the Illinois Annual Conference in session at Springfield, Ill., and appointed to the Peoria Mission; 1836, to Bureau Circuit; 1837, Lebanon Circuit; 1838, Carlisle Circuit; 1839, the Mt. Carmel Station; 1840, the Wabash Circuit; 1841, the Mt. Carmel Circuit; 1842, Peoria Circuit again; 1843-44, the LaFayette Circuit. In 1845 he was granted a rest for a year, and sustained a superannuated relation to the Conference. We find this entry in his diary: "Shall I live another year? I leave this to God, my Redeemer. Praise God, oh, my soul." In 1846 he was made effective and sent to the Henry Mission; 1847-48 to the Hennepin Circuit, with Bro. A. D. Field for his colleague during the last year; 1849 to Brimfield Circuit; 1850 to Washington Circuit, with H. Ritchie as colleague; 1851, was reappointed to Washington Circuit, with Bro. H. P. M. Brown as colleague; 1852, to Pleasant Hill Circuit; 1853, to Whitefield Circuit; 1854, to Marshall Circuit; 1855, Chillicothe Circuit, with Wm. Watson as colleague; 1856-57, the Reading Mission; 1858, the Spring Bay Mission. In 1859 his name appears again on the Superannuated list, but in 1860 he is employed to travel the Marshall Circuit, with B. P. Wheat as colleague; In 1861 he traveled the Minonk Circuit. He closed his long and useful career in the active service of the ministry on the Wethersfield charge, where he served the Church in 1864-65.

Of his family there were ten children, eight sons and two daughters. Four sons and one daughter with Mother Cumming survive the now sainted pilgrim and warrior. Two of the sons and one grandson are members of the Central Illinois Conference, Rev. Wm. A. Cumming, Rev. Joseph S. Cumming, and Rev. Frank H. Cumming.

Father Cumming was a man whom men delighted to honor, and in whose heroic soul dwelt the spirit of fidelity, fraternity and love; fidelity to God's truth and the Great Head of the Church. He was a preacher of the Word, and declared the whole counsel of God. Those that knew him trusted him as a friend and loved him as a brother. He was a Methodist Itinerant among the pioneers of this country. Much of the territory was without settled roads. There were but few bridges; the pathways were wild and rough, and the journeys long and sometimes perilous. His commission was from the King of Heaven. His message was the gospel of eternal truth. His errand the rescue of a lost world. He stood a hero in those heroic days, and the Master whom he served had not given him the spirit of fear, but of power, of love, and of a sound mind.

For many years past he had been very frail. His steps were feeble and his sight gone. He was like one leaning upon the top of his staff waiting for the dawning of a new day. But although the outward man grew weaker from day to day, until the keepers of the house did tremble and the strong man was bowed, and the windows were darkened, and desire failed, yet there was a light that shone brighter and brighter unto the perfect day. For over seventy years he had walked with God in the wilderness, and his testimony was that he had never seen the righteous forsaken nor his children left destitute. During the last months and weeks of his earthly pilgrimage he discoursed freely and confidently with Mother Cumming and others about his final triumph and eternal rest. On Feb. 11 he said: "I realize that God has taken away my sight here in order that I may open my eyes in heaven." On the 12th, when Sister Cumming asked him if he loved the Lord with all his soul, mind and strength, his answer was: "I do; I have the sweet peace of God in my soul." On the 15th he said: "I would not live away; I ask not to stay where storm after storm rises dark o'er the way; I have been unfaithful, but am trusting in God's mercy alone; eternity has a great meaning in it." He frequently inquired about the brethren of the Conference. He loved the preachers; their company was his delight. He counted the months and weeks until the Conference would meet again. He said, "I love the Lord and the Methodist people." On Feb. 25th he said, "I feel very grateful that there is an intercourse between God and my soul, and I mean to hold on my way until I get to heaven." March 2d he was asked, "Do you accept all your sufferings as from the Lord?" The answer came: "O, yes; come and stamp thine image on my heart; God is everything to me; he is my all in all; the test will come; it will not be long." March 12th he said: "Glory, glory, I am settled on the rock; O, what a blessed Jesus, full of glory." One day as he talked with the faithful companion of all his journey, Mother Cumming, about the hardships of

the past and the change to come soon, he said: "Let it come, let it come; the Lord has been with us; glory be to his name." He said to a neighbor, "Tell my friends that I am on the King's highway." March 23d, when asked if he would not rather be absent from the body and present with the Lord, he answered: "Yes; but I want all the fitness; to be washed, purified and cleansed." On one occasion he said: "I have just been thinking how it would look on the other side; when we come to look for our trials they are all passed."

During the last few weeks it was an effort for him to speak, and his words were very few, but O how precious to those that heard him. One day after he had made an attempt to speak, it was said to him, "In a little while, Father Cumming, you will lay down this body that is so near worn out, and all things will be made new." After a moment he said slowly: "It will be a glorious change, I am sorry I cannot see you, but there all will be light and glorious company." For some days before his departure he rested in a deep sleep. Three days before the end came his pastor said to him: "You will soon see the King in his beauty; the Christ you have preached to the world so long will not leave you now, but will take you into His presence." It was then that the lips that had preached Jesus and the Resurrection for three score and ten years, uttered the last testimony of the grand old warrior and hero and blood-washed saint. He said, "Yes." Filled with Jehovah and all his glorious wisdom, he made all this rebellious world, yes, made it all, and has kept it for his beloved children, and it never enters into the heart of man to conceive the glory of heaven for us. It was very early in the morning of the Sabbath day, June 9th, 1889, that he entered into rest. Funeral services were held in the First M. E. Church, Peoria. A large congregation of people was present, also about twenty members of the Central Illinois Conference.

MRS. PAULINA DANFORTH WOODRUFF

Paulina Danforth was born March 7, 1813, in Fort Covington, N. Y. She received a good education in the Academy in that place. She was converted in 1829 under the ministry of him who afterward became her husband. She was married to Rev. George C. Woodruff August 31st, 1832. She came to Illinois in June, 1855, and settled in Geneseo. She was a faithful woman, enduring the trials which fall in the lot of an itinerant's wife, in the various charges which her husband served. At last old age crept on apace. Her energies began to weaken, her sight grew dim, and in the twilight shades of January 22, 1889, the spirit forsook the clay, and at a bound was in the presence of Jesus. Her religious experience was bright, her faith triumphant and her reward glorious. Her pastor saw her many times during her last days. She invariably gave the testimony of the righteous, "I am ready to go." She left one son and one daughter, grown to maturity. Her aged companion travels the pathway in loneliness, hoping to meet her in the morning land.

MRS. A. M. BROWN.

Amanda M. Brown, wife of Rev. Geo. W. Brown, of the Central Illinois Conference, died at her home in Abingdon, Ill., Dec. 4, 1888, in the 66th year of her age.

She was the youngest daughter of Rev. Daniel Irons, a Baptist minister. She was born in the State of New York, but her parents moved to the State of Michigan and settled in Ann Arbor, when she was quite young.

At the age of nine she became a Christian and united with the Baptist Church, of which she remained a consistent member until her marriage, when she united with the M. E. Church.

On August 22, 1843, she was united in marriage with Rev. Geo. W. Brown, then a Missionary among the Indians in the region of Lake Superior, and for five years she shared with him the hardships and dangers incident to a Missionary's life on the frontier at that early day. After this they spent six years on Circuits and Stations among the early settlers of that frontier region.

In 1854 Brother Brown was transferred to North Ohio Conference, and stationed at Monroeville. In 1856 they came within the bounds of the Central Illinois Conference, and were appointed to Cambridge Circuit. Brother Brown continued in the regular work in this Conference for 26 years, his faithful wife cheerfully sharing the responsibilities and enduring the hardships incident to a minister's life.

When her husband was compelled after many years of hard labor, to take a Superannuated relation, they removed to Abingdon, Ill., where they were always glad to see and entertain their many friends.

Sister Brown was called upon to pass through the great sorrow of burying all her children—four in number, but amid it all, she said, "God gave, God hath taken away, and what am I that I should rebel?" Faithfully did she watch at the bedside of her husband, who for a number of years has been an almost helpless invalid.

Her last sickness was protracted, lasting nearly a year. In answer to a question from her husband, the day she died, she said, "I trust in God with all my heart."

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. B. F. Tallman, her pastor, assisted by Drs. R. Hancy, J. S. Cumming and J. R. Jaques.

As a Christian she was faithful and efficient, as a wife she was loving and helpful; but her work is done. Her aged companion with whom she had walked for 45 years, still lingers, though in great weakness and in much affliction. May the God of all grace comfort and sustain him and give him at last an abundant entrance into the city where dwell his kindred and his King.

MRS. MATTIE COOPER KING.

Mattie Cooper King, wife of Rev. L. D. King, of Central Illinois Conference, was born October 8, 1864, in Beaver County, Pa., and died at Washington, Ill., May 19, 1889. She removed with her parents to Williamstown, W. Va., at the age of six years. Here she joined the church at the age of ten, and was converted very clearly at the age of sixteen, and from that time till death her testimonies were always bright. She was married to Rev. L. D. King, of West Virginia Conference, June 12, 1879, to whom she was a helpmeet indeed in the work of the Master. She was unassuming, yet a faithful Christian worker. She was the humble instrument in God's hands in saving many souls. To know her was to love her. In her ten years of ministerial life she was not known to have an enemy. She always had good neighbors. She was a sufferer for over four years with that dreadful disease consumption. She wanted to live to raise her dear children and to work for the Master, yet she would frequently say, "If it is God's will that I shall die it is all right." She was very anxious about the children until about a month before she died, when she said to her husband, "I am not going to worry any more about the children, but trust them to the Lord, for I cannot take care of them the way I am, and they may be better provided for after I am gone." From that time until her death she said nothing more to her husband about the children. She frequently said during her last illness, "I am going home." The morning before she died, when she knew she could not live much longer, she said to her husband, "Farewell, farewell, farewell; O, what peace and joy!" She was pure-minded, pure in all manner of conversation, pure in heart. She leaves a husband and three little girls to mourn her loss. There is great sorrow in Brother King's home, but not a hopeless sorrow. She sleeps in Jesus.

MRS. CATHARINE HALL.

Catharine, wife of Rev. Z. Hall, was born in Schoharie County, New York, in 1812. At the age of twenty-two she united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, and lived a devoted member of it during the remainder of her life. August 3d, 1881, Brother and Sister Hall were married, and for seven and a-half years she made the closing days of the pilgrimage of Rev. Zadoc Hall pleasant and happy. Feb. 6th, 1889, she passed to the glory world, entering into the rest of God's children, and leaving our venerable brother to finish life's journey alone, in much weakness of body and mind.

MRS. ELLA WARD.

Ella Ward was born in Gardner, Ill., April 11, 1862, and died at her home on the Goodwine Charge, Aug. 25, 1889. She and her husband were converted at Verona, Ill., in the spring of 1886, and both united with the M. E. Church at that place and since that time she has been truly a consecrated Christian. Sister Ward began her Christian life by an earnest and faithful study of God's word. In this way she became an intelligent Christian, and as a result made rapid growth in the Christian life. Indeed her life beautiful and symmetrical.

Sister Ward possessed a good intellect and enjoyed fair opportunities for intellectual culture. There were elements in her nature that drew to her many warm and devoted friends. December 12, 1878, she was married to Walter J. Ward, and God blessed this union with four interesting children, two sons and two daughters. The eldest is about eight years of age and the youngest at the time of her death, was one month old. She was very happy in her married life, and was ardently attached to her family and tenderly mindful of every interest of each person in her home.

Her interest in the work of the Christian ministry in which her husband was engaged, was constantly deepening, and her whole soul was enlisted to make his ministry a grand success. Her last illness was of short duration and her sickness was of so violent a nature that she conversed but little, but her life and her testimony when in health, assure us that she was ready to meet the Master at his coming. Sister Ward was a true woman; the breath of suspicion never touched her pure life. She has passed to her inheritance on high. Her remains were deposited in the cemetery at Verona.

MRS. LOUISA BORLAND.

Mrs. Louisa Borland, wife of the Rev. John Borland, a Superannuated member of the Central Illinois Conference, died at Centralia, Ill., August 30th, 1889. She was born in Erie County, N. Y., February 29th, 1828. Her parents moved to this State when she was quite young, and settled in Scott County, where she remained until her marriage, which occurred in the month of July, 1848. From the time of her conversion she was a devoted and successful Sunday School worker, and continued so until the responsibilities of the family increased and demanded her care. She was punctual in attending upon all the means of grace, and was rarely absent from the class room and prayer meeting. Alton City

was the field of labor assigned to her husband immediately after their marriage, and was the one in which her experience as the wife of an itinerant Methodist preacher began. She was the devoted mother of four children—two boys and two girls—three of whom died in childhood and youth. When quite young, the two boys died at Abingdon within a few hours of each other, and were buried in the cemetery there. The other, a lovely girl of 14 years, died in Washington, and her remains rest in the cemetery at Peoria. Sister Borland had been a partial invalid ever since she passed through the fearful horrors of the cyclone at Mt. Vernon, Ill., on the 29th of February, 1888. In the very center of the path of the cyclone the dwelling stood, in one room of which an unseen but Almighty arm protected her and her husband, while desolation and death reigned around. The shock was too severe for her nervous system, and she gradually lost flesh and strength until six weeks ago, when she was unable longer to sit up, and after this her decline became more rapid, until the lamp of life expired, and in great peace she passed away. Shortly before breathing her last she beckoned to her husband and pointed upwards, her eyes following the same direction, and when asked if she saw anything, with a look of satisfaction she nodded assent. Bro. Wallar, the pastor of the church, asked her, after she became speechless, if she was "trusting in Christ," and if "Christ was precious," to both of which she nodded assent. She leaves a husband and one daughter. Her husband, upon whom the bereavement falls severely, is able to adopt the language of perfect acquiescence, "Not my will but Thine be done." The funeral services were conducted by Bros. Wallar and Casey, of the M. E. Church, and Rev. Wolcott, of the Episcopal Church.

FIRST DAY.

MORNING SESSION.

PONTIAC, ILL., SEPTEMBER 17, 1890.

The Thirty-Fifth annual session of the Central Illinois Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church was called to order by Thomas Doney in the M. E. Church, Pontiac, Illinois, September 17th, 1890, at nine o'clock A. M.

On motion of G. R. Palmer, Dr. W. H. Hunter was elected temporary chairman.

The Sacramental Service.—After the reading of the 126th Psalm, the 726th hymn was sung, and Dr. R. Haney, assisted by the Presiding Elders administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

Roll-Call.—The Secretary of the last Conference called the roll, and 156 members and probationers answered to their names. (See Roll.)

Secretary.—On motion by R. Haney, the Conference decided to elect a Secretary by ballot, the first ballot to be informal.

Tellers.—A. K. Tullis, A. C. Price, J. W. Haney and B. W. Baker, were appointed tellers. A ballot was taken for Secretary.

Standing Committees.—On motion of B. F. Tallman, the Presiding Elders were elected a committee, to nominate the standing committees. The Presiding Elders presented their report and the committees were elected as nominated. (See list of Standing Committees.)

The tellers reported the result of the informal ballot for Secretary. On motion of G. J. Luekey, the four names having the largest number of votes were made the nominees, and another ballot was taken.

Treasurer.—On motion of R. Haney, H. D. Clark was elected. Conference Treasurer by acclamation.

Dr. A. S. Hunt, Secretary of the American Bible Society, was introduced, and addressed the Conference.

The tellers reported the result of the second ballot for Secretary, and there being no election, another ballot was taken.

Bishop S. M. Merrill arrived and took the chair.

The tellers reported the result of the third ballot and there being no election, a fourth ballot was taken, which resulted in the election of H. K. Metcalf as Secretary.

Statistical Secretary.—On motion of J. B. Dille, J. D. Calhoun was elected Statistical Secretary, by acclamation.

Assistant Secretaries.—The Conference Secretary nominated D. S. McCown and J. F. Robinson as his assistants and they were elected.

The Statistical Secretary nominated as his assistants, Vincent Aten, J. A. Riason, O. T. Dwinell, C. L. Davenport, B. F. Eckley, G. D. Hensell, and they were elected.

Conference Hours.—On motion of J. D. Smith, the time of meeting was fixed at 8:30, and of adjournment at 11:45 A. M., the first half hour to be spent in devotional exercises.

Bar.—On motion of J. S. Cumming, the bar of the Conference was fixed at the circle of seats at the rear of the large windows.

Assistant Treasurers.—The Treasurer nominated A. K. Tullis, T. J. Wood, J. G. Blair, and J. L. Miller to be his assistants, and they were elected.

Reports.—R. D. Russell called attention to a resolution adopted last year in reference to the presentation of reports, and they were collected in accordance therewith.

Dr. A. J. Kynette, Corresponding Secretary of the Board of Church Extension, was introduced, and addressed the Conference.

Bancroft.—On motion of J. W. Haney, Miss J. M. Bancroft, was invited to address the Conference. She was introduced, and spoke on the Deaconess movement. The time was extended on motion of J. G. Evans. On motion of B. F. Tallman a committee was ordered on the Deaconess movement. The following were elected as that committee: P. A. Cool, B. F. Tallman, and J. W. Haney.

Editor.—On motion of G. R. Palmer, F. H. Cumming was elected Editor of the Conference Daily.

Substituted.—On motion of M. V. B. White, C. W. Green was substituted for H. K. Metcalf on the committee on Temperance and Constitutional Prohibition; P. A. Cool for J. D. Calhoun on the committee on the Sanctity of the Sabbath; and C. W. Ayling for D. S. McCown on the committee on Conference Relations. On motion of J. S. Cumming, J. G. Evans was substituted in the place of H. D. Clark on the committee on Epworth League.

Accounts from the New York Book Concern were presented, and handed to W. W. Carr.

On motion, the Conference adjourned to meet at 7:30 p. m. The list of the standing committees was read, and their meetings announced.

J. G. Evans was appointed to conduct the devotional exercises this evening. Announcements were made, the Doxology was sung, and Bishop Merrill pronounced the benediction.

EVENING SESSION.

Conference opened pursuant to adjournment at 7:30 p. m., Bishop Merrill in the chair.

Devotional Exercises were conducted by J. G. Evans.

Absentees.—The names of the absentees of the morning session were called. On motion, it was decided to dispense with the further calling of the roll.

The Journal of the morning session was read and approved.

T. J. Wood was excused to attend to committee work.

Report.—The report of the Conference Board of Church Extension was presented and read, and after an address by Dr. A. J. Kynette, was adopted.

Committee on Worship.—On motion of M. V. B. White, the Presiding Elder of the Streator District and the Pastor of the Pontiac M. E. Church, were appointed the committee on public worship.

J. W. Haney was appointed to conduct the devotional exercises tomorrow morning.

The committees were called, announcements were made, and on motion the Conference adjourned.

The Doxology was sung, and Dr. Kynette pronounced the benediction.

SECOND DAY.

MORNING SESSION.

THURSDAY, Sept. 18th, 1890.

Conference assembled at 8:30 A. M. with Bishop Merrill in the chair.

Devotional exercises were conducted by J. W. Haney.

The Journal of the previous session was read and approved.

Referred.—Papers concerning the Sunday School Union and Tract Society, Education and Veteran Ministerial Relief Association, were referred to the proper committees.

Select Number.—On motion of C. O. McCulloch, a Select Number of eleven to consider the case of I. O. Mallory was ordered.

The Presiding Elders were appointed to nominate the Select Number.

The committee reported the following names: B. F. Tallman, J. W. Frizzelle, R. W. Ames, A. Bower, G. L. Taylor, J. F. James, T. M. Harris, S. P. Alford, Wm. Woolley, T. W. McVety, Joe Bell, and they were appointed.

J. E. Taylor was appointed counsel for the church.

B. W. Baker and C. W. Green were recognized as counsel for the defense.

J. G. Evans was appointed by the Bishop chairman of the Select Number, and J. F. Robinson was detailed as Secretary.

On motion, the charges and documents relating to the case were placed in the hands of the Select Number.

Railroad Secretary.—On motion, C. E. Legg was invited to act for the Conference as Railroad Secretary.

An Invitation to visit the State Reform School on Friday afternoon was read and accepted with thanks.

Chartered Fund.—The Bishop announced that the Conference was entitled to draw on the chartered fund for \$30. On motion of J. W. Haney, the draft was ordered.

A communication from the committee on general Conference expenses was read and referred to the Presiding Elders.

A communication from the New York Concern on the Episcopal Fund was presented and referred to the proper committee.

The Twentieth Question:—"Was the character of each Preacher examined?" was taken up.

Galesburg District was called. The character of J. S. Cumming, the Presiding Elder, was passed and he made his report.

On motion the preachers were instructed to state, in addition to the missionary report, whether all the collections had been taken.

Note for Statistical Tables.

According to orders no cents appear in these columns; hence some charges will be reported fractions of dollars less than they paid. But, where the Secretary was able, he added these fractions together, and gave credit for a dollar. For example, where report said \$50.30 for missions from Churches, and \$10.70 from Sunday School, the Church will be credited with \$51.00, or the Sunday School with \$11.00, so that the total will balance. So where report read \$ S. Union \$2.50, and Tracts \$2.50, it will frequently appear that one of these is reported \$3.00 and the other \$2.00, so that the charge would have all the credit possible.

The Central Illinois Conference has borne honorable part in this work and has shared liberally in its advantages.

From its first organization to November 1st, 1889, the collections in our churches have aggregated - - - - - \$33,444 41

For the year closing with this session, - - - - - 2,114 00

Making a total of - - - - - \$35,558 41

Besides this some of our members have contributed direct to the Loan Fund of the Parent Board as shown by the Annual Reports of the Board. Special mention should be made of the contribution of David McWilliams, \$7,000, and our venerable Dr. W. H. Hunter, \$5,000, the working value of which, being made only by loans, increases year by year. The loans from the fund created by Brother McWilliams have already exceeded \$20,000, and out of it 62 churches valued at about \$150,000, have received aid in time of need. Brother Hunter's contribution of more recent date has not yet been augmented so much in volume by loans returned from churches borrowing, but over 20, valued at about \$50,000, have rejoiced in the relief and help it has afforded. Out of the general funds into which the collections from our churches have been paid, 65 churches within our Conference have received gifts of \$13,764.15 and loans from the Loan funds of \$6,850, making in all, aid from our own churches of \$20,114.15. Of the \$6,850 loans, the churches borrowing have returned about one-half. The balance outstanding Nov. 1, 1889, the date of the last report was \$3,458.25, and since our last session we have recommended aid to churches as follows:

The general condition of the treasury at Philadelphia above reported, and the fact that the amount authorized for use within our bounds has been overpaid to the amount of \$822.30 have compelled the others to await the receipt of funds.

For the current year we have been asked to raise for this cause \$5,000, and of this amount our own needy churches may receive \$1,500, leaving \$3,500 as our contribution to the larger number, many of which are doubtless more needy in the regions beyond. In proportion as we have fallen below the \$5,000 asked, all must suffer in their due proportion.

We urge the members of the Conference to use the helps provided by the Board, especially *Christianity in Earnest and Glad Tidings*, and by the methods prescribed by our discipline, secure every year the full amount asked of us. All of which is respectfully submitted.

Reports of Standing Committees.

EDUCATION.

The Committee on Education respectfully reports as follows:

GARRETT BIBLICAL INSTITUTE.

This is our representative School of the Prophets in the west, and ranks among the first in the land. At the last Commencement, twenty-one Conferences were represented by thirty-five visitors. The excellent examinations in the various departments gave evidence of thorough work, and attest the high grade of the school.

The attendance last year was 268, the largest in the history of the Institution.

There are five commodious buildings and a library of 5,000 volumes, to which has been recently added by Dr. Terry, the complete Library of the Fathers of the first twelve centuries in the original texts; also a photographic copy of the *Codex Vaticanus*, the gift of Mr. Wm. Deering, of Chicago.

The Swedish and Norwegian schools are fully organized and well attended, and a German school has been recommended. The faculty of the Institute is composed of men of wide experience, and unsurpassed ability as instructors, and has among its members those who have acquired well-earned reputation as authors in the world of theological letters. We recommend as official visitors Rev. J. R. Jaques, D. D. Ph. D., and Rev. E. McClish, D. D.

DE PAUW UNIVERSITY—SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY.

We recognize with pleasure the growing prosperity and influence of this Institution and assure our young men, who are preparing for the ministry, that it is well worthy of their confidence and patronage. We recommend as visitors from this Conference Rev. B. W. Baker and Rev. Samuel Van Pelt.

NORTHWESTERN UNIVERSITY.

We rejoice in the continued growth and increasing popularity of this Institution: The number of students during the past year was above fourteen hundred; abundant facilities have been provided for a still larger number.

We sympathize with the trustees and patrons of the University in the loss by death of its President, the late Dr. Joseph Cummings; and congratulate them in securing as his successor, Dr. H. W. Rogers, late Dean of the Law School of Michigan University. We recommend Rev. W. W. Carr as Trustee.

GRAND PRAIRIE SEMINARY

has enjoyed a year of increased prosperity. The number of students enrolled last year was 351, not counting the art and chorus classes. The matriculation at the opening of the Fall term is very encouraging. The current income was \$500 above expenses. In addition to the Literary department, there are well organized Commercial, Art and Musical departments. We recommend this school as a Seminary of high grade, doing very superior work. We recommend the appointment of Rev. E. McClish, D. D., as President and Rev. C. E. Pickett as Professor, and also the Revs. R. B. Seaman, J. E. Mercer, T. W. McVety, F. W. Merrell and P. A. Cool as Conference visitors.

ILLINOIS WESLEYAN UNIVERSITY.

The last year was the most prosperous in the history of the school. The catalogue shows in all departments, 1,450 students. The colleges of Law and of Music are unsurpassed. Mrs. S. M. D. Fry, after a service of 15 years as Professor of English Literature, severed her connection with the University at the last Commencement, and has identified herself with the schools of Minneapolis.

\$13,000 of the \$25,000 required to meet the conditions of Dr. H. Buck's endowment gift, has been raised and we are hopeful that the condition will be met. The outlook for the University was never more hopeful. We recommend as Trustees, Revs. F. H. Cumming, C. O. McCulloch, B. W. Baker and Mr. W. B. Harvey, of Washington, and as visitors Thomas Doney, R. Crewes, J. W. Frizzelle, M. V. Crumbaker and B. F. Tallman. Also we request the Bishop to reappoint Rev. B. W. Baker as Financial Agent.

HEDDING COLLEGE.

The report of this Institution shows it to be in a more prosperous condition than for years. This is largely due to the able management and untiring industry of Pres. J. G. Evans, D. D. During the past year the attendance of students has greatly increased, and the current expen-

ses have been met in full. A plan for endowing the Colleges has been perfected and the President will give his time during the present year to this interest.

We recommend the appointment of the Rev. J. G. Evans, D. D., LL. D. as President, and the Rev. J. R. Jaques, D. D. Ph. D. and the Rev. H. C. Birch, A. M. as Professors in the College.

We nominate as Trustees for the ensuing three years, Revs. P. A. Cool, B. F. Tallman, M. V. B. White and G. B. Snedaker, also laymen M. C. Kimball, M. C. Soule, A. B. Stickle and Madison Reece, M. D.

We nominate as visitors Revs. T. J. Wood, H. J. Boatman, Wm. Crapp, John Rogers, A. M. Stocking and Lewis Springer.

EPWORTH LEAGUE.

We heartily endorse the Conference report of the Committee on Epworth League. While the Church College should not be sectarian, it ought to be so far denominational, as to provide for the development of Christian activity in harmony with the usages and methods of the church owning and patronizing the same.

All organizations for the promotion of Christianity should be in connection with and under the supervision of the Church of God; and as the patronage of our colleges comes largely from our own families, it is highly important that the religious training in our colleges be such as will fit our young people to enter efficiently and with hearty sympathy upon home church work.

We therefore recommend that the Epworth League be organized and recognized officially in all our Colleges as the best society for the promotion of Christian activity among our young people.

AMENDED CONSTITUTION OF THE EDUCATIONAL SOCIETY.

ARTICLE I. This Society shall be known as the Educational Society of the Central Illinois Conference, auxiliary to the Educational Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

ART. II. The officers shall consist of a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, who with five additional members, shall constitute a Board of Managers. These officers and managers shall be nominated by the Committee on Education and elected by the Conference at each annual session.

ART. III. One-half of the Educational collections taken within the bounds of the Conference shall be paid to the Treasurer of this Society and the other half shall be forwarded to the Parent Society.

ART. IV. The Board of Managers shall meet at each annual Conference and make a distribution of money among the Illinois Wesleyan University, Hedding College and Grand Prairie Seminary, in accordance with the number of young men in each Institution respectively, studying for the ministry, from within the bounds of the Central Illinois Conference.

ART. V. The Treasurer shall loan the amounts assigned to each

Institution, according to the recommendation of the Faculty, and also strictly adhering to the regulations which have been or shall be adopted by the Parent Society, and under such other regulations as the Board of Managers may adopt.

TEMPERANCE AND CONSTITUTIONAL PROHIBITION.

WHEREAS, It is unequivocally admitted by the Christian Church of all lands, and the best citizens of our country, that the supporters of the liquor traffic are the avowed enemies of the Church and Christian civilization everywhere, therefore

Resolved, 1st, That we reaffirm our position as a Conference, taken in favor of prohibition, at its first session, thirty-four years ago, and declared in these words, viz: "*Resolved,* That being in favor of prohibition * * * and believing that our deliverance from the curse of the liquor traffic depends upon its success, we will support for office none but those who are prohibitionists from principle, and will urge all whom we can influence to do likewise."

2nd. That we still vigorously maintain every advanced step taken by our Conference and Church in favor of prohibition, from that day to this.

3d. That we record our thanks to Almighty God for the evident signs of progress in this great reformation among our citizens, and especially among the Evangelical churches of our land; and we hereby express our purpose to continue our sympathy and unite our efforts, as far as practicable, with every organization whose chief and avowed purpose is to destroy the liquor traffic in our own land, and as far as possible, prevent the importation of strong drink into Asia, Africa, and other places where the Christian religion is thereby brought into disrepute, and the efforts of the missionary annulled.

4th. That we most earnestly and respectfully petition the managers of the anticipated Columbian Exposition to exclude from the grounds and premises which they control, the sale of all intoxicating beverages, not only as a protection and example to our own countrymen, but also as a potent example to the nations of the world of our determi-

nation to rid the land of this gigantic curse, by the consistent exercise of every power at our command.

5th. That we are uncompromisingly opposed to license, either high or low, and that since the allies of the rum power have publicly declared that in the exercise of the elective franchise, they will not support any candidate for office who is in any way allied to the prohibition movement, we therefore feel driven to the necessity of affirming that, in the exercise of our elective franchise we cannot support any candidate for office, who is not known to be openly and avowedly opposed to the liquor traffic.

6th. That we deeply sympathize with Nebraska in her struggle for deliverance from the rum curse, and we will earnestly pray that she may have a great and decisive victory in November next.

The Central Illinois Conference of the M. E. Church is interested in the Sunday School Union as is shown by the 365 Sunday Schools manned by 4,399 Officers and Teachers, with 32,315 Scholars. The Sunday School Union is increasing the number of Sunday Schools all over the world. In 1889 there were organized in connection with the Union 732 new Schools, an average of 14 every Sunday.

The Tract Society seeks to diffuse the blessings of education, civilization, and Christianity, to every land. Every church taking up a collection for this Society may on application by the Pastor, have the value of one half of the collection returned in tracts for distribution.

BOOK ACCOUNTS AND PERIODICALS.

We are highly gratified to learn from our Book Agents, of the increased circulation of our Sunday School periodicals from 700,000 to 1,700,000 in the last ten years, [an increase of 133 per cent.] and of the unparalleled prosperity of the Book Concern, indicated by the enormous sales, amounting to \$48,000,000 in the first ninety-eight years of its existence—\$20,000,000 more than those of all other Protestant denominational publishing houses and \$23,000,000 more than the sales of the American Bible Society, exceeding all by \$5,000,000 and reaching *in the last decade* the magnificent sum of \$17,000,000, or over one-third the amount realized in its entire history, and providing a total dividend this year of \$110,000 to the Superannuate fund, of which our Conference receives \$1634.

And recognizing the importance of the publishing enterprises of the Church, and the wise management which secures increasing prosperity to those interests, thus greatly promoting every department of Church work, we are

Resolved, That we will as far as possible patronize our own publishing houses and seek to still further advance these interests by the purchase and sale of our own in preference to other publications.

2d. That, with confidence in the godly judgment of the publishing Agents as servants of the Church, in the production and selection of suitable literature for our Sunday Schools, we will if possible persuade all our people to get books, lesson helps and papers through their hands, earnestly advising against the use of helps from other sources.

3d. That we will counsel and preach against the reading of literature that "does not tend to the knowledge and love of God."

4th. That, appreciating their ability and loyalty to the Church, the nation and social interests, we commend our Church papers, particularly

the *Northwestern Christian Advocate*, and the *Christian Advocate*, as worthy a place in all the homes of Methodism, and will endeavor to increase their circulation among all our members, especially among the official members of our charges.

We commend the Editors, for the bold, strong and logical advocacy of legal prohibition, the common school system, higher education, purity of the Sabbath, national reform, and all other vital questions now agitating the public mind.

5th. That we will not encourage the multiplication of unofficial papers which seek to occupy the place and to secure the patronage legitimately belonging to the official organs of the Church.

6th. That we welcome the advent of the *Epworth Herald*, and earnestly recommend that our young people familiarize themselves with its pages that they may catch the spirit and zeal of its live and able Editors.

7th. That, as a conservator of the best literature of the Church, Biblical and philosophical, we commend most heartily the *Methodist Review* and its scholarly Editor, Dr. Mendenhall, to the entire ministry and membership of our churches.

8th. That we will seek to promote intelligent and more liberal support of Missions, Home and Foreign, by a wider circulation of *The Gospel in all Lands*, and *World Wide Missions*, which furnish ample information, and are worthy heralds of the spirit and mission of the Church of Christ.

Resolved, 3rd. That it is high time for the Church of God to lift its voice and enter a more emphatic protest than ever before, against the desecration of the Christian Sabbath, by the authorities in the great corporations of our land, railroads, mills, factories and such like.

Resolved, 4th. That among the rights of man, none are more clear and obligatory upon all in authority than the right of the laboring man to the Sabbath Day, as a time of needed rest, and for the mental and moral improvement of himself and family.

And that we are in hearty sympathy with all just measures that have for their purpose the securing of National, State and municipal observance of the Sabbath as a day of rest for man and beast, and that we will ever pray and labor until this nation shall become a Sabbath keeping people.

FREEDMEN'S AID AND SOUTHERN EDUCATION SOCIETY.

For 215 years the colored people of the South were subjected to the severest bondage and deprived of educational advantages. The proclamation of Abraham Lincoln declaring them free, and the action of the government making them American citizens, brought prominently before the Christian and patriotic mind the imperative necessity of providing them with such education as would make them intelligent and safe citizens.

The Freedmen's Aid Society was organized by the Methodist Episcopal Church to make special provision for this work. The great results achieved by this Society cannot possibly be measured by figures or calculated by human ability. The institutions of learning which have been established and the Christian knowledge which has been acquired and diffused are the marvel of the age. The results show the great prosperity of the investment, and none of the benevolences of our Church is entitled to more consideration than this, which touches this down-trodden and worthy people. But the realization that the colored people were not the only subjects of need, caused our Church at the General Conference of 1880 to take such action as would meet the requirements of the needy whites of the South, and hence we have the Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society. The financial year of the General Society closing June 30, 1890, shows a gratifying increase in the collections of our Church in behalf of this work of \$17,851.00 over the previous year, putting us beyond the \$100,000 line in Conference collections.

The Secretaries of this Society are asking for, absolutely needing, and confidently expecting \$125,000 from collections only for the ensuing year. The increase from all sources exclusive of loans last year was \$266,684.48, an increase over last year of \$39,973.24. This large increase, however, has not met the needs of the Society. The debt has grown. In view, therefore, of the sacred obligation which rests upon our Church in behalf of this Society, in the perpetuation of the great work it has prosecuted so grandly. Therefore,

Resolved, 1st. That we commend to the attention of our brethren the live and ably edited Journal of our Society, the *Christian Educator*.

Resolved, 2nd. That we will give this Society our hearty support, and do our utmost to raise the \$4,068.00 apportioned to our Conference for 1891.

We further recommend the adoption of the following:

"WHEREAS, 1891 will mark the completion of a period of twenty-five years since the organization of this Society; and,

"WHEREAS, The great success which has attended its work since its organization has been such as to call for devout thanksgiving to God from the whole Church; and,

“WHEREAS, Special addresses and services, calling attention to and emphasizing the inception, development and widening work of this society, would be of great value to the whole Church, by showing the blessed results accomplished with the money already expended in directing the thought of the ministry and members of the Church to the necessity of enlarged contributions by annual collections to the cause of Christian education in the South; and also in directing the minds of the individuals contemplating special gifts to the cause of God to the opportunity afforded in the South of aiding in the endowment of struggling institutions of learning; be it

“Resolved, 1st. That the year 1891 be observed by this society as Quarter Centennial Jubilee Year, and that our ministers and people throughout the Church be, and are hereby strongly and affectionately invited to join in a suitable celebration of the glorious work accomplished through the instrumentality of this society during the first twenty-five years of its history.

“Resolved, 2nd. That the Executive Committee are hereby instructed to issue an appropriate address to the Church upon the proposed celebration, and to plan the details necessary to its success.”

EPISCOPAL FUND.

Your Committee on Episcopal Fund would call attention to the provisions of the Discipline for the support of the Bishops. In paragraphs 361 of the Discipline, we find the following positive requirement:

“The amount apportioned to each pastoral charge for the support of the Bishops shall be a pro rata claim with that of the stationed Preachers and Presiding Elders, and no Preacher or Presiding Elder shall be entitled to his allowance except to the extent to which the claims of the Bishops are also met by the Circuit, Station or District with which such Elder and Preacher are connected.” A careful examination of our published Minutes reveals the fact that in a large majority of the reports this disciplinary provision is faithfully observed, but in quite a number of cases the amount reported for the Episcopal Fund falls far below the pro rata division as required by the Discipline. We therefore present the following resolution for adoption:

Resolved, That the Presiding Elders of this Conference be requested to see that the provisions of the Discipline for the pro rata division of funds raised for ministerial support are carried out.

STATE OF THE CHURCH.

Your committee submits the following report:

We are especially grateful to Almighty God for the evidences of spiritual prosperity among us, as we are also for our material benefits.

We hail with joy the glad tidings of missionary success throughout the Church, and pray that the whole of God's people may catch the spirit of christly benevolence and conquering zeal constantly voiced in World Wide Missions.

We rejoice over spiritual conquests reported within the bounds of our Conference; but we devoutly covet a much larger number for the glory of our Christ. The redemption of this generation depends upon the men now in the field. The importance of this truth cannot be over-estimated. We are passing through a critical period in the religious history of our country. Glorious will it be if we turn threatened defeat into victory. If we fail, great will be the moral and spiritual disaster that shall ensue. The hour calls for renewed zeal and consecration on the part of all God's people.

There is an all too evident tendency toward mere ritualism in religion among our people—a lack of deep piety and devotion to God. The paraphernalia of religion can never suffice for subjugating the world to the Lord Jesus Christ. Nor can sacramental Christianity effect the moral renovation of the world. The power of God within the church can alone bring salvation.

A stream cannot rise above its fountain. So the moral and spiritual condition of the Church determines its influence in meeting and conquering the foes that are without. From the vantage ground of a high spiritual earnestness the Church may alone expect to elicit and command profound attention among men.

The attitude of the Church toward all popular forms of sin should be that of uncompromising hostility. The Church must utterly refuse to break the power of her Christian testimony by compromise with the popular evils of the day.

Example here, as elsewhere, is more cogent than precept. Hence we urgently plead that all our people, by their conduct on the Sabbath day, give not occasion to the enemies of God to blaspheme. The Christian is bound to insist on a distinction of days by the character of his conduct and by the employment of his time; and to hold fast, by both precept and example, the doctrine of the Christian Sabbath as ordained of God; and the obligation to keep the same in a reverential spirit as universal and perpetual.

We also plead that our people desist from all forms of popular dissipation, such as theaters, lotteries, circuses, and the like, which things are baneful in their moral influence and destructive to religious life. We plead also for reverent attendance upon all the means of grace, for a hearty support of our class-meetings and prayer-meetings. These social means of grace are pre-eminently adapted to increase spirituality in the life of Christian people.

We also recognize the pure and spiritual character of our own hymns, and plead for their use in all our churches and congregations. In some quarters the young are growing up without a knowledge of the Methodist hymns, and so are strangers to the religious fire and holy zeal that glows in the Christian lyrics of our own Church. This is a

grave misfortune. Let us make a familiar knowledge of our own hymns a part of the spiritual heritage of the future Methodism by their constant use in our congregations.

The article of our faith relative to Baptism declares that "the baptism of young children is to be retained in the church." We believe that there is need that our people be called afresh to consider the solemn duty of consecrating their children to God in infant baptism

1st. That \$800 have been received through drafts drawn by Bishop Ninde and paid as salary to Rev. N. W. Deveneau, missionary among the French at Kankakee.

2nd. Owing to the fact of our French congregation largely removing to Chicago and elsewhere, we deem it expedient to recommend that the mission at Kankakee be operated from Chicago and by the Rock River Conference as soon as satisfactory adjustments to that end can be effected.

3rd. Forasmuch as there are large mining districts within the bounds of our Conference wherein are thousands of foreigners and native-born Americans who seem beyond the reach of our present church machinery, and that Peoria, Rock Island, Streator, and other cities, as well as rural districts within our bounds have large populations that are untouched by our already overburdened pastors, we recommend that a committee of three persons be appointed by Bishop Merrill to draft a plan for the formation of an organization to be known as the Conference Domestic Missionary Society of the Central Illinois Conference, in harmony with paragraph 354 of the Discipline, and submit the same at our next annual session.

EPWORTH LEAGUE.

We, your committee on the Epworth League, respectfully submit the following report:

WHEREAS, The Epworth League, the organization of Methodist young people, has in its brief history grown to proportions which make

its consideration at once interesting and important, and has already gone or will soon go with its 3,500 chapters and 250,000 members, wherever Methodism has gone, and

WHEREAS, In our own Conference with its scores of chapters and nearly 6,000 members it is proving itself a power, demonstrating that the Epworth idea came none too soon, commending itself to all charges and compelling the church to guide and control its movements with great care, therefore

Resolved, 1st. We recognize the fact that the Church is of God—a divine institution to save man and evangelize the world, and are unalterably opposed to all organized efforts to carry on religious work by such methods as tend to underrate the position and value of the ministerial office in the minds of the young. We prefer to emphasize those methods and organizations under the authority and by the direction of the Church, and look with grave apprehension upon those efforts exerted by organizations without the pale of the Church, which are responsible to no ecclesiastical body either in matters of doctrine or method.

2d. That at all of our camp meetings one day be assigned to the League, to be known as Epworth League day, and that a mass meeting be held, to which all the young people shall be urged to come.

3d. We urge upon the attention of the Presiding Elders and Pastors the necessity of securing chapters in every pastoral charge, and as far as practicable in every society within the bounds of the Conference. Believing that this movement is to be the great Methodist epoch of the century, we would advise that every pastor avail himself of its mighty possibilities; but at the same time, that he guard the movements of this young giant, and see to it that its relations to all other departments of work are wisely and harmoniously administered.

4th. We extend cordial greeting to the Young Peoples' Societies of all other churches who are engaged in the great work of taking this generation for God.

5th. We advise the formation of a chapter of the League in every institution of learning in our Church, esteeming this organization as superior to all others in attracting, holding and training the young people of Methodism in lines of Christian activity.

6th. That we endorse the *Epworth Herald* as the official organ of the League, and will commend it to our people as an able and faithful exponent of the spirit and life of this great movement. We also urge that the authorities in our several Colleges make each College paper the local official organ of the Epworth League within its patronizing territory, thus bringing the young people into closer affiliation with its interests and work.

7th. That we recommend the appointment of Rev. H. D. Clark as a member of the Seventh General Conference District Board.

8th. That the Presidents of the several District Leagues be instructed to arrange for a Conference mass meeting some time during the Conference year. Respectfully submitted,

Memoirs.

JAMES FERGUSON.

Rev. James Ferguson, of the Central Illinois Conference, died in Farmington, Illinois, December 15th, 1889. He was born at Loysburg, Bedford County, Pennsylvania, June 25th, 1825. In 1844 he came to Illinois and located in Canton, where in the following year he was converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church under the ministry of Rev. Richard Haney.

He married Miss Martha A. Clark, June 1st, 1847. He was admitted into the Central Illinois Conference on trial in 1860 and into full membership and ordained Deacon by Bishop Baker in 1862, and ordained Elder by Bishop Scott in 1864.

In hope of improving his health, in 1887 he was transferred to the West Nebraska Conference, but, experiencing no benefit, at the following session was returned by transfer to the Central Illinois Conference, from which time he sustained a superannuated relation. During his ministry, which was invariably successful, he served the following charges: Smithville, Cuba, Fairview, Ipava, Bardolph, Vermont, Elmwood, Altona, Farmington, and Brimfield in Illinois, and Sydney in Nebraska.

He was a sincere Christian, and among men the peer of the manliest, which, joined with his consistent home life, gave great force to his faithful preaching and produced the conviction upon all that he believed and lived according to the doctrines he inculcated. The life and labors of this good man were a constant surprise to his friends. Afflicted with severe hemorrhage of the lungs even before he entered the ministry, he continued in armor, a soldier under orders, for twenty-eight years. To none are the words of Charles Wesley more appropriate, "Servant of God well done." One who has known him from the beginning of his work as a local preacher, and intimately associated with him through his entire ministerial life, testifies: "His life is one of the most symmetrically beautiful and abundant in labors under continuous bodily affliction, that it has been my privilege to witness." In his sufferings he did not lose the spirit of cheerfulness; on the contrary, his life seemed a

continuous ray of unclouded sunlight, ever imparting its cheering influence to all about him. His widowed companion, an invalid for several years and a great sufferer, and four sons and one daughter, survive to mourn. To them sweet is the consolation of his Christian life and triumphant death. A man rich in Christian experience, a kind, loving husband, a tender father, a true friend, with a life's ministry well accomplished, there was an absolute grandeur in his death. Through his transparent character a radiant peace played upon his steady faith, before which the dashing of death was as the rippling waves of the brook-let, and all the valley was lighted with His presence whose smile had so long been the joy of his soul.

The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. W. H. Hunter, D. D., assisted by several members of the Conference. He was buried in Oak Ridge Cemetery, Farmington, Illinois, not far from the resting place of the sainted Summers, to await the summons of Him who is "the resurrection and the life."

L. B. DENNIS.

Rev. L. B. Dennis, son of Benjamin and Nancy Dennis, was born on the east shore of Maryland, at Salisbury, July 9th, 1812, and died in great peace and holy triumph after a lingering sickness at his late home in Knoxville, Illinois, April 2nd, 1890, aged seventy-seven years, eight months and twenty-three days.

When eight years of age his father died, leaving him in care of a maternal uncle until he was seventeen. Feeling the importance of an education, he determined to surmount the difficulties in the way, and at once began by working, first for clothing, then for books, board, and tuition, until he entered Norwalk Academy, Ohio, where he prosecuted his studies under the direction of Prof. Fillinghast, in whom he found a valued friend. March 9th, 1834, he was married to Betsey Davis Holloway in whom he found a help-mate indeed, who walked by his side for fifty-six years, suffering with him the privations, hardships, and trials of a pioneer itinerant's life. There were born to them two daughters and two sons, one son and one daughter dying in infancy. Rev. B. C. Dennis, a successful minister and member in Central Illinois Conference and Lucella S. Cabbage at Knoxville, Illinois, with the faithful wife and five grand-children survive.

August 13th, 1833, he united with the Methodist Episcopal Church under the ministry of Rev. David Lewis, of the Ohio Conference and the next morning, after a night of struggle and wrestling, he was gloriously converted to God. His conversion was of the most positive character, being sun bright, and he was indeed a new man. He at once commenced active labor for the Master, and soon was made a class leader.

Without waiting for further authority he at once engaged in special efforts for the salvation of souls. After a few months he recorded in his journal: "The Lord blessed my labors with a glorious revival; over one hundred were converted and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church. Soon after that I was licensed to exhort by Rev. Wesley Brock of North Ohio Conference." Owing to his limited education he

hesitated about entering more public ministerial duties until December, 1840, when he was licensed as a local preacher. His determination to enter the work as an itinerant was not reached until different temporal reverses compelled him to feel that an unseen hand was leading in the way he had not intended.

In August, 1842, he yielded to the call and gave himself to the Christian ministry and was admitted into the Illinois Conference. He was at once transferred to the Arkansas Conference, where the demands were very pressing, and without conferring with flesh and blood, he and his faithful wife started for their far away field of labor, receiving as salary for the first six months one dollar in money. There he labored two years respectively on Saline and Columbia circuits, having revivals in both.

At the Arkansas Conference in 1844, held in the State House in Little Rock, he was ordained a Deacon by Bishop Thomas A. Morris.

Owing to the secession of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, he was transferred to the Iowa Conference and had the honor of being the first transfer to that Conference.

At Bloomington, Iowa, 1846, he was ordained Elder by Bishop L. L. Hamline.

His appointments in Iowa were, Wapello, Birmingham, Keokuk, Fort Madison, Mount Pleasant, Muscatine, Burlington (Old Zion), Fairfield, and Iowa City. During this time he spent two years in the Missouri Conference, serving a year each at Hannibal and Ebenezer in St. Louis.

In the Spring of 1855 he was transferred to the Missouri Conference, and appointed Presiding Elder of North Kansas Mission District. In the following year he became one of the founders of the Kansas-Nebraska Conference,—his work being in Kansas where he spent almost ten years, most of the time in the Presiding Eldership. He had much to do in forming the Free State and Prohibition sentiments in that State. While pastor at Lawrence in 1862 he had one of the most glorious revivals of his eventful life.

In the fall of 1864 he was transferred again to the Iowa Conference and stationed for the second time at Old Zion, in Burlington. At the close of that year he was appointed by Bishop Janes Secretary of the Iowa Conference Centenary Society, and spent the next year at Marshall. In 1867 he was appointed Presiding Elder of Oskaloosa District, where he served with honor three years, when he was transferred to the Southern Illinois Conference and stationed at Carbondale, where he spent two pleasant, profitable years. In 1872 he was appointed to Metropolis, Illinois, and in 1873 was transferred to the Central Illinois Conference. His appointments in this Conference were Henry, Gilson (two terms), Keithsburg, Yates City, Trivoli and Elm Tree. The last he served as a superannuate.

During the second year of his second term at Gilson his health failed, and at the following session of the Conference in 1855 he was superannuated, which relation he sustained until he was transferred to Heaven. After his superannuation, his health improving somewhat, he labor-

ed successfully as an evangelist in different places, the best results being at Fairfield, and Birmingham, charges he had served in the Iowa Conference.

Forty years ago, Rev. L. B. Dennis was known as one of the most successful revivalists in Iowa. In such work his soul delighted and all his charges felt the good effects of his revival spirit. He was Presiding Elder ten years, Secretary of his Conference twice, Delegate to General Conference once, Reserve Delegate twice, and once he presided through an entire session of his Annual Conference in the absence of the Bishop, making the appointments and attending to all the duties of a Presiding Bishop, except ordinations.

The greater part of his ministerial life was spent in pioneer work for which he seemed especially qualified, and in carrying it forward he hesitated at no hardship or exposure. It was a great cross to him to lay aside his itinerant's armor, even when advancing years made it necessary, but he accepted the inevitable as cheerfully as such an active temperament would permit. During his active ministry of over forty-three years not less than 5,000 were converted and brought into the Church through his instrumentality, many of whom are now in the ministry, some of them in high positions in the Church, among whom is Chaplain McCabe, our Missionary Secretary.

Brother Dennis preached his last sermon in the Methodist Episcopal Church, Knoxville, Illinois, November 10th 1889, from I. Thess: 5:14-15. His last sickness was long and painful. For months his friends could see that he was failing, and he realized this, hence he took a trip to Eureka Springs, Arkansas, hoping to be benefited. But he found no relief, and returned to Knoxville, February 7th 1890, where all that loving hearts and kind hands could do was done for him. He suffered intensely, yet through it all not a murmur escaped his lips, and he would frequently say, "You are so kind to me." One day he said: "It is easy to do God's will, but pray that I may have grace to suffer God's will." As he neared the end, when asked by mother Dennis: "How does it look?" he answered, "It's all clear." At another time he said: "A few more waves and I will be home." When moving him in bed or changing his position he would frequently say, "I am so tired, wait, let me rest a little." But now he is at rest in Heaven, and while friends sorrow here, he rejoices with loved ones there. His last words were: "All is clear." He was conscious until the end. As the family were around the bed his pastor sang his favorite hymn, beginning: "Oh thou God of my Salvation," all saw an expression of sanction on his face as he ceased to breathe and went home.

The funeral in the M. E. Church, Knoxville, Ill., April 4th, 1890 was conducted by Rev. W. H. Hunter D. D., assisted by Rev. R. Haney, D. D., Rev. J. S. Cumming, D. D., Rev. J. G. Evans, D. D., Rev. G. J. Luekey, Rev. R. D. Russell, and the Pastor, Rev. Vincent Aten. Besides these there were present a large number of the ministerial brethren to do honor to the memory of the fallen hero and sympathize with the sorrowing family. The services were very solemn and impressive, well befitting the occasion. In the coffin, opened on his breast, with the index finger of his right hand pointing to the Twenty-third Psalm, was

the first Bible Rev. L. B. Dennis ever owned, and the one he carried through the swamps of Arkansas.

A large company of friends followed to the grave in the beautiful cemetery at Knoxville, where rests his mortal remains. Thus passed away one of God's noblemen.

ZADOC HALL.

Zadoc Hall was born in Sussex County, Delaware, August 1st 1801. He went home last Easter, aged 88 years 8 months and 5 days.

At the age of nine his father died, and seven years later the family came to Ohio and settled near Zanesville. With him it was the old and familiar story of struggle against difficulty for livelihood and a little education. He writes: "In 1819 I made up my mind to seek religion and be religious and for this purpose attended a camp meeting at Newark, Ohio." While there a new trouble arose, for he was impressed with the thought that he must become a preacher.

Some time after this, while returning from a prayer meeting, light broke in upon his soul, and peace took possession of his heart. He was taken into the Church by Rev. T. A. Morris, afterward Bishop.

Until 1830 Brother Hall put off the thought of preaching, but now by the influence of two sermons, one by Bishop Soule, the other by the sainted Christie, he was compelled to ask for license to exhort, which was granted October 30th, 1830. The following July he was granted license to preach. In the fall of the same year he came to Illinois.

He says: "In 1832 I was received into the old Illinois Conference, and was sent to Peoria Mission." "Now after so many years are passed it seems that the good Lord desired me to lay the work for others to build on, for this was new ground. I had no members nor plan given me, but I made a three weeks circuit, and as my Presiding Elder, (I. Walker) instructed me, I formed the plan for Peoria and Princeton Missions. I fully concluded that at some future time this would be a great place for the M. E. Church. In 1833 I was sent to Pekin circuit. I introduced Methodist preaching into Hennepin and preached a few times in Lacon.

"In 1834 I was sent to Bloomington circuit. This circuit the year before had paid only sixty dollars. I saw that something must be done, so I set to work and that year they paid me one hundred and twenty dollars. I recommended a division of the circuit and Merrian Mission was formed. I was sent back to the Bloomington part, and we built the First Methodist Church in that town in 1836. The building was 32 by 34 feet, and was dedicated the first Saturday and Sunday in August 1836. In 1836 I was sent to Kickapoo and Brimfield, where I found only nineteen members." In 1837 Brother Hall was appointed to Princeton circuit. In 1838 he served the Church at Hennepin and Lacon and while on that charge he built a parsonage at Magnolia. In 1839 he served the Washington and Pekin charge. Rev. J. C. Pinckard, now of Kansas, was associated with Brother Hall that year and they had a three weeks circuit of seventeen appointments.

Brother Hall said it was a good year, and they built the old Washington Church. For a few years he was stationed as follows: 1840, Danville; 1841, Monmouth; 1842, Lewiston; 1843-4, Washington; 1845, Roscoe; 1846-7, Rock Island. Here he built a parsonage. In 1848 Galena; 1849, Indiana Street, Chicago, and here he built a parsonage. 1850, St. Charles; 1851, Peru; 1852-3, Lacon; 1854, Dillon; 1855, Spring Bay; 1856-7, LaSalle District; 1858, Washington. Removed by Presiding Elder to Metamora, and at this time introduced Methodist preaching in Eureka. 1859, LaSalle District; 1860-1, Middleport District; 1862-3-4, Pekin; 1865-6, Metamora; 1867, Snatchwine; 1868, Mackinaw.

Thus for thirty-seven years Brother Hall toiled hard to promote the interests of Methodism. In 1869, he superannuated. In 1875 his first wife died, to whom he was married in 1825. In 1881 he married Mrs. Catharine Smith who lived till the Spring of 1889, when she left her earthly home for the better country.

During all these years since his last marriage he lived in Washington, much respected and loved by all who knew him. After the death of his son in 1889, he went to live with his son Lewis in Kansas, where he remained in great peace of mind awaiting the summons which found him ready.

His body was brought back to Washington, where at rest it awaits the resurrection morning.

ADAM HENRY HEPPERLY.

A. H. Hepperly was born in Gettysburg, Pa., September 4, 1819, and died April 18th 1890. He moved to Illinois in 1835, and for some years worked as a blacksmith in Peoria. In 1840 he was converted at a camp-meeting, while Rev. Richard Haney was kneeling with him at the altar. He at once received the witness of the spirit, and continued to rejoice in the full assurance of faith through life. From that time until his death he was a faithful witness to the reality of experimental religion.

In 1848 he was married to Miss Maria Wilson, of Elizabeth, Ill. Two sons and a daughter were born to them, all of them dying in infancy, and in 1854 the wife and mother followed the children to the spirit world. Four years later he was married to Miss Jerusha Robinson, of Henry, Ill., who, with three of their four daughters, survives him.

Shortly after his conversion he felt it to be his duty to preach the Gospel, but for a time resisted the impression. Finally he yielded, and having made what preparation he could he was licensed to preach. After spending some years as a local preacher, in 1853 he was admitted on trial in the Rock River Conference, and stationed at Warren and Millville. In 1854 he was sent to Nanvoo where he did two faithful years' work. In 1855 he was received into full connection and ordained Deacon in Rock Island by Bishop Janes. In 1856 he was sent to the Chillothe circuit. In 1857 he was ordained Elder at the Conference held in Abingdon by Bishop Scott and stationed at Henry. He was stationed

in 1858 at Toulon, in 1859 at Tiskilwa, in 1861 at Galva, and in 1863 at Wyoming. At the close of his second year at Wyoming his nervous system was so prostrated that he was compelled to take a superannuated relation, which he held until death.

He was a spiritual man, much given to prayer. Being naturally emotional, and very earnest and devout, he was sometimes demonstrative, or as the fathers said, noisy in prayer and preaching. He was a good man, a faithful friend, a kind and affectionate husband and father. The last years of his life were sad because of the clouded condition of his mind, and during part of the time he was an inmate of the Asylum for the Insane. All was done for him that affection could do, but he found no relief until he passed from the shadows of earth to the unclouded light of Heaven.

There can be no doubt that our open-hearted, guileless, impulsive and loving brother has gone to the presence of the Master whom he so ardently loved and that with clear vision and immortal devotion he praises God in endless day.

His body was laid to rest in the beautiful cemetery of Mount Bloom, near Tiskilwa, the home of his bereaved wife and daughters. He sleeps with Jesus.

JOB B. MILLS.

Rev. Job B. Mills was born in Norfolk, Virginia, in November 1816. His educational advantages were none of the best, but his bright active mind gave him rank among the most intelligent of the community. He learned the trade of decorator and finisher of fine work. He soon left this and began life on the stage as an actor. Having married a Christian wife, he was led by her to attend Church. Here he was found by the Holy Ghost, converted to God and began at once to prepare for the work of the Christian ministry.

He began preaching about the year 1850, and continued until about 1868 or '69. He was a man full of faith and the Holy Ghost, and God blessed his labors by giving him many sheaves from the harvest field. For many years he was entirely blind, but even after blindness had shut out the light of this world he used to declare the Gospel message with great power. He died July 2nd 1890, in Neosho, Missouri.

His love for the Church of his choice was not only manifest in his faithful life, but ere he passed to his reward he left a legacy of one thousand dollars to be put at interest for the benefit of the Conference Claimants of Central Illinois Conference.

While the data are not at hand for an obituary of any length for this Conference record, God the father will not fail to reward His faithful servant.

MRS. ESTHER JANE MATTHEWS.

Her maiden name was Whitman. She was born in Pike County, Ohio, May 6th 1820. In early life she moved to Illinois. She was con-

verted and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1838, when 18 years of age. She was married to Dr. Jacob Matthews in Tazewell county, Ill., April 8th 1840, and lived for several years in Mackinaw, where her husband practiced medicine.

In 1854 Dr. Matthews was admitted on trial in the Rock River Conference, and when the Conference was divided in 1856, his lot fell within the bounds of what is now the Central Illinois Conference. For many years they moved from place to place as they were appointed by the authorities of the Church, several times filling the same charge for a second term, and always doing faithful work for the Master.

Her life was characterized by energetic work, strength of conviction, and great liberality, and she was a leader and a favorite among the people wherever Providence cast her lot. She was especially active in the Sunday School.

When Dr. Matthews' health failed they went first to Nebraska, then to Union, Iowa. After the death of her husband in 1887, she went to live with a daughter in the Vineland Home, Orange, California, where on Sunday, Jan. 27th 1889, aged 69 years, she ceased to toil and suffer.

She was a good woman and died happy. In accordance with her expressed wish, her body was brought back to their old home at Union, Iowa, and buried beside the grave of her husband, with whom she had lived so happily for forty-seven years. She has left five children to mourn her departure. Her memory can never die.

MRS. ELIZABETH J. MOREY.

Mrs. Elizabeth J. Morey, wife of Rev. Amos Morey, was the daughter of Robert and Elizabeth Shoemaker. She was born in West Virginia, December 12th 1836.

Quite early in life she removed with her parents to Illinois, settling at Pre-emption, Mercer County.

Here she was married to William Francis Little, Feb. 17th, 1859. To them were born two children, Ida E., and Edwin H. Little. Mr. Little was killed Dec. 7th 1862, in the battle of Prairie Grove, while aiding in the suppression of the Rebellion.

After Mr. Little's death Sister Morey cared for her children alone until Oct. 22nd 1867, when she married Rev. Amos Morey, then an active member of the Central Illinois Conference. With him she labored on the following charges. Pre-emption, one year; Millersburg, two years; Ellison, Fairview and Smithville, each one year; Kickapoo and Cuba, two years each; and completed her journeying with one year, 1877-78 at Avon. Here Father Morey, feeling that his days of itineracy were past, settled with his loved wife, to spend a quiet evening tide. But sister Morey was very suddenly called away, leaving Father Morey, with the infirmities of age creeping on, and her youngest daughter, Ora B. Morey, alone.

Sister M. was converted and joined the M. E. Church in her fifteenth year, at Wood Hill, Va., and during all the years that followed she remained a faithful, consistent Christian. She was a true Pastor's

wife, always ready for such work as would aid her husband and honor Christ. She was punctual in all religious duties, an efficient and willing worker at the altar, where by her prayers and counsels she aided many penitents to enter a new life.

In Sunday School work she had few equals, and whether as Superintendent or teacher, her fitting words were always instructive.

She was a Methodist. The doctrines and usages of our Church were greatly appreciated by her

When her husband retired from pastoral work, she centered her efforts in the interests of the society where she made her home. Here her prayers, words of comfort and counsel, and her arduous labors will not be soon forgotten. The declaration of one of the oldest members of the Church at Avon expresses more than my words possibly can. "We never lost a member, by death or otherwise, whose removal has been so deeply felt." Her home was a pleasant resting place for many of my brethren, as well as myself, and all could bear witness to her kindly welcome. Sister Morey's last illness was brief, but her sufferings were very severe. She gave such counsel to her family respecting their arrangements for the future, as seemed best to her, made some requests in regard to her funeral, and then awaited her release, which came at midnight of Thursday, September 26th, 1889.

Her funeral was held in Avon, on Sunday, September 29th. We were assisted in that service by Rev. Bros. B. C. Dennis and Brant of our own Church, and the Pastors of two sister Churches. Bro. Dennis preached an able discourse from Numbers 23:10. On Monday we laid her remains away, to rest until the resurrection, in the cemetery at Rock Island, Illinois.

MARIA PATTEN CUMMING.

Sister Maria Patten Cumming, daughter of Samuel Patten, was born in Montgomery County Virginia, June 16th, 1808. She was married to Rev. Wm. Campbell Cumming, at Abingdon, Virginia, August 25th, 1829.

Her husband, Father Cumming, as we remember him now, had at that time been in the itinerancy nearly seven years. From that day forward for nearly sixty years they shared together the joys and hardships of the life of the pioneer Methodist Ministry.

She was a woman of more than usual intellectual and moral force of character. Her life and spirit was after the pattern of the mother of Methodism, Susanna Wesley. She looked well to the affairs of her household. Her children were not only cared for as all mothers would do, but great pains were taken in their mental development, moral training and spiritual welfare.

Two of her sons are members of the Central Illinois Conference, Rev. J. S. Cumming, D. D., and Rev. Wm. A. Cumming; also a grandson, Rev. F. H. Cumming, Ph. D. These with Samuel P. Cumming, Esq., of Peoria, Ill., Harvey Cumming, Esq., whose home is in the State

of Missouri, and one daughter, Mrs. Jane C. Vanbuskirk, whose residence is in the State of Iowa, are all of the family that remain on this side the veil.

Her children rise up and call her blessed, while her holy life and faithful work as wife and mother form a lasting monument to her Christian womanhood.

She was a careful and intelligent reader of the history of Methodism and so became a wise and safe counsellor for her husband, in his administration as preacher and pastor. She was a constant and painstaking student of the Holy Bible, hence she possessed a clear understanding of the great doctrines of the Church of God. In early life she was wonderfully saved from sin. She knew the power of regenerating and sanctifying grace. Her heart and soul were not only made pure by His infinite grace, but she lived and wrought in the vineyard until the maturity of Christian character crowned her declining years with the halo of glory that belongs to a life that is hid with Christ in God.

The last few months of her life were very lonely. The companion of her youth had passed to the upper Salem in holy triumph. She was only waiting in the most blessed and peaceful confidence for the messenger to bid her move again. This time not into a parsonage or some new field of labor, to join a company of new friends and toilers in the vineyard here, but to join her husband and loved ones in the mansion on high. Many of the companions of a lifetime were in waiting, to share with her, the joys of a permanent home of rest and peace. She fell asleep at the home of her son and daughter-in-law in Peoria, Ill., Oct. 23d, 1889. She had selected the scripture and hymns to be used at her funeral services. She passed away with the testimony, "*I have kept the faith.*"

MRS. MARGARET HEAD.

Margaret Foraker was born in Delaware, on the 8th day of March, 1816. When three years of age her parents moved to Rainsburg, Highland County, O., where in childhood she was converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, of which she continued a consistent member until the close of her earthly life.

On the 2nd day of January, 1834, she was married to Thomas Head, who in 1847 was licensed to preach, and in 1854, was admitted on trial to the Cincinnati Conference, of which he continued a member until 1869, when with his son, Rev. M. A. Head, he was transferred to Central Illinois Conference, of which he continued a member until his translation to the Church triumphant, on the 31st day of March, 1886. Since that time she has patiently awaited her master's summons to join her loved ones who are before the throne of God, until Monday afternoon, Jan. 27th, 1890, she peacefully bade adieu to earthly friends, to enter upon the life eternal to which she had so long, and faithfully, and earnestly aspired. Sister Head was a devoted Christian woman, whose gentle spirit manifested itself in her life with such attractiveness that it

won to her many enduring friendships in all the churches to which as a true helpmeet she went with her husband to minister.

Four of her six children survive to mourn their loss, one of whom, our esteemed brother, Rev. M. A. Head, is with us, whose bereavement with sincere sympathy we share, while we commend them to Him who has said in his Word, "As one whom his mother comforteth, so will I comfort you."

MRS. J. E. LOWTHER.

Jennie Embleton Lowther, wife of the Rev. A. W. Lowther, of the Central Illinois Conference, departed this life in Deer Creek, Illinois, on the 15th day of June 1890. She was born in Hartford City, West Virginia, Oct. 13th 1863.

It would be pleasant to reveal the beauty of her life by the evolution of its deeds, but the limits of this memoir allow but little more than brief reference to a few character points. Under the influence of the Holy Spirit and the helpfulness of a well ordered Christian home, she was converted to God in early life and soon became a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church. From the beginning her Christian life was positive and her experience clear and joyful. Those who knew her best aver that her life was a constant testimony to Christian discipleship. She was united in marriage to Rev. A. W. Lowther on the twenty-first day of August 1889, and entered upon her life work with a devotion that won for her the love of those with whom she came in contact, and proved her fitness for the position of a pastor's wife. Her devotion to friends graced with beauty and loveliness every circle in which she moved; thoughtful of their wants, self-poised in every exigency, cheerful and affectionate under burdens, happiest when she could serve others. She drew many to her in a constantly increasing love. Modest and retiring, she won the respect of all who knew her, by a blameless life, discreet conversation, generous estimate of others, gentle bearing and steadfast devotion to Christ. Her ideal home was one in which godliness, kindness, charity, and purity predominate.

Her sweet disposition and cheerful hope failed not when the last sickness came. Christ was her portion to the end. "Early in the morning, the first day of the week, at the rising of the sun," it became evident that the end was at hand. We were not prepared for her translation but she was ready for the mighty change. When she became aware that her case was hopeless she made final disposition of her affairs, gave utterance to her trust and resignation, sang the doxology, prayed for unsaved friends and relatives, repeated the Lord's prayer, bade mother and husband good-bye, sang again three lines of the doxology and, doubtless, hearing the voice of one saying, "Come up higher," she pressed forward and passed within the gates of the "City of God." Earth has lost a choice spirit but heaven is richer for its transfer to the company of those "who have washed their robes and made them white

in the blood of the Lamb." We doubt not her loving spirit restfully waits the coming of those who mourn their loss.

We leave her gracious influence to be like "ointment poured forth" upon the Church among whose elect ladies she so richly deserves honorable mention. A large and tearful congregation at the funeral and delicate floral offerings placed upon the casket attested the deep love with which she is cherished.

Another home is desolate, another pastor goes about his work with a constant sense of loneliness, yet with the realization that "God is for him" and that he lives in the sympathies of his brethren.

Conference History.

CHAPTER I.

The present "installment" of the History of the Central Illinois Conference is prefatory only, touching as it does events that transpired before the Conference was organized. From rather scarce data at hand a few facts are gathered concerning some genuine pioneering at a very early day.

The first appearance of Illinois in the annals of Methodism is its recognition as a Missionary Appointment in the Cumberland District of the Western Conference, in the "Minutes of Methodist Conferences" for 1804. Benjamin Young, the first preacher sent to the Illinois Circuit, seems to have been an athletic and rather fast young man. He was admitted on trial in 1801, hurried through his course of studies in three years, (there being no record of his ordination as Deacon,) was ordained Elder and appointed missionary to Illinois in 1804, and was expelled from the Church in 1805!

Joseph Oglesby was the next preacher who traveled any part of the territory now belonging to us. He was admitted on trial in 1804, came to Illinois Circuit in 1805, where he found sixty-seven members all told, white and colored, continued in the itinerancy five years longer and located in 1810.

The Western Conference, which was formed in 1802, included the work in Ohio, Indiana, Tennessee, Kentucky, Mississippi, Missouri, and Illinois. It was divided in 1812, after which Illinois appears as a District in the Tennessee Conference. While in the Western Conference, the following preachers were sent to the Illinois Circuit, which was a part of the time in the Cumberland District with Wm. McKendree as Presiding Elder, and part of the time in the Indiana District: 1806, Chas. B. Matheny; 1807 and 1809, Jesse Walker; 1808, John Clingan; 1810, Abraham Amos; 1811, Daniel Fraley; 1812, George A. Colbert.

The General Minutes for 1813 tell us that in that year Illinois had 547 members, was one of six Appointments in the Illinois District of the

Tennessee Conference, that James Dixon was the preacher and Jesse Walker the Presiding Elder.

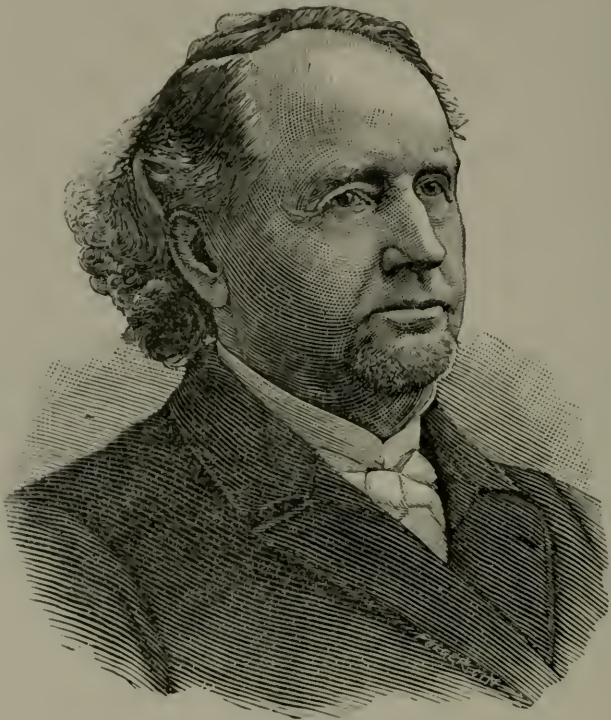

FIRST DAY.

MOLINE, ILL., SEPTEMBER 9, 1891.

The Thirty-Sixth annual session of the Central Illinois Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, met in the First M. E. Church, Moline, Illinois, September 9, 1891, at 8:30 o'clock a. m. with Bishop I. W. Joyce in the chair.

The Sacramental Service was conducted by the Bishop, assisted by the Presiding Elders and several of the brethren.

Roll-Call.—The Secretary of the last Conference called the roll, and 162 members and probationers answered to their names.

Secretary.—On motion of C. O. McCulloch, H. K. Metcalf was re-elected Secretary, by acclamation.

The Fifth Question.—Before responding to the address of Mr. Galloway the Bishop raised the fifth question:—"Who are Admitted into Full Connection," called forward the members of the class and addressed them on the work of the ministry. He then addressed the Lay Conference, and propounded to the class before him the usual questions.

At this point the Lay Conference retired.

The characters of the following were passed, their collections stated, the committee of examination reported, they were represented by their respective Presiding Elders, were admitted into full connection and elected Deacons: W. J. Ward, W. F. Jameson, W. G. Hearne, B. F. Mattox, N. D. Hanes and O. A. H. De la Gardie.

J. T. Bliss was admitted, being a Deacon.

C. F. Middleton and C. E. Pickett were continued on trial.

On motion of Thomas Doney, the time was extended.

The Thirty-Fourth Question was recalled, and Watseka was chosen as the seat of the next Conference.

Order of the Day.—The election of delegates to the General Conference was taken up. The Bishop announced that the Conference was entitled to five delegates.

Tellers.—C. W. Ayling, J. B. Dille, L. F. Cullom and Richard Crews, were appointed tellers.

The Conference ordered all ballots containing less than five names thrown out, that all ballots be preserved till the vote was declared, and that a majority of all votes cast shall constitute an election.

A vote was taken, and J. F. Robinson was delegated as the Secretary to retire with the tellers, to count the ballots.

Dr. W. P. Stowe addressed the Conference on the work of the Western Book Concern.

On motion of Richard Haney it was decided that when we adjourn, we adjourn to meet at 2 o'clock p. m. to-day.

Dr. J. C. W. Coxe, addressed the Conference in the interests of the Sunday Union and Tract Societies.

Freedmen's Aid.—The Bishop announced that \$4,068 was apportioned to the Conference for next year, by the Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society, and the matter was referred to the Presiding Elders.

On motion of J. G. Evans, the report of Grand Prairie Seminary was referred to the committee on Education.

The announcements were made, the Doxology sung and the Benediction pronounced by Dr. Stowe.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference convened at 2 p. m., Bishop Joyce in the chair. Devotional exercises were conducted by J. G. Evans.

Ballot.—The result of the ballot taken at the morning session for General Conference delegates, was announced. Whole number of votes cast 172, necessary to a choice 87. No one having received the requisite number, the Bishop declared that there was no election and ordered another vote which was taken and the tellers retired to count the ballots.

The Third Question:—"Who Remain on Trial?" was taken up.

The characters of the following were passed, their collections stated, the committee reported, representation was made by their respective Presiding Elders, and they were continued on trial: David F. Wilson, Samuel Albrecht, Philias A. St. John, Martin L. Miller, John W. Moles and Jacob A. Alford.

The Twenty-First Question:—"Have any Died?" was taken up. The following were reported as deceased: Roswell N. Morse and Wm. Matheny.

The Twenty-Second Question:—"Have any been Transferred and to what Conferences?" was taken up. The following transfers were announced: C. B. Allen to the North Nebraska Conference, Eli McClish to the California Conference and G. W. Gue to the Oregon Conference.

The Eighteenth Question was recalled and G. M. Kelley, J. W. Demming, A. R. Morgan, N. W. Devenean and J. J. Walter were granted a supernumerary relation.

The Nineteenth Question was recalled and J. A. Windsor was granted a superannuated relation.

T. C. Workman.—The special committee to which was committed the request of T. C. Workman for the restoration of his parchments, reported, recommending that his request be granted.

A motion was made to adopt the report of the committee. During the discussion, on motion H. Brink was granted the privilege of reading a paragraph from a pamphlet bearing on the subject.

On motion of C. O. McCulloch, the previous question was ordered.

By vote of the Conference, the report of the committee was not adopted.

Second Ballot.—The tellers reported the whole number of votes cast 159. Necessary to a choice, 80. C. O. McCulloch, Thomas Doney and M. A. Head having received the requisite number, were declared elected delegates to the General Conference.

Another vote was taken and the tellers retired to count the ballots.

Bill.—The Secretary presented his bill for expenses, \$6.85, which on motion of T. Doney was allowed, and ordered paid from the Minute fund.

Reporter.—On motion, D. A. Perrin was elected assistant Reporter for the Moline Journal.

Minute Publisher.—On motion of Dr. Evans, N. T. Allen was elected Minute publisher.

Editors.—H. K. Metcalf and J. D. Calhoun were elected editors of the Minutes.

Official Records.—On motion of G. J. Luckey, it was ordered that the published Minutes be the official record.

Bound Volume of Minutes.—On motion of Thomas Doney, the secretary was instructed to have the four numbers of the Minutes of the present quadrennium bound in one volume, to be sent to the next General Conference by our delegation.

Blanks.—On Motion W. H. Witter was elected the committee on Conference blanks for next year.

Parchments.—On motion of C. O. McCulloch, the parchments of Theophilus Pool were ordered restored.

J. W. Haney was appointed to lead the devotional exercises to-morrow morning. The announcements were made, the Doxology was sung and Dr. Hunter pronounced the Benediction.

FOURTH DAY.

MORNING SESSION.

SATURDAY, September 12, 1891.

Conference opened at 8:30 A. M., with Bishop I. W. Joyce in the chair.

J. W. Haney conducted the devotional exercises.

The Journal of yesterday's sessions was read and approved.

Third Ballot.—The tellers reported the result of the third ballot:

Whole number of ballots cast.....	169
Necessary to a choice.....	85

B. F. Tallman having received the requisite number, was declared elected.

A fourth ballot was taken and the tellers retired.

Sabbath Services.—On motion of A. K. Tullis, the vote of yesterday, by which it was decided to hold the Sabbath services in the church, was reconsidered.

J. W. Haney moved that all the services of to-morrow, except the morning service, be held in the church.

J. G. Evans moved as a substitute that the morning and afternoon sessions be held in the Young Men's Christian Association hall and the evening services in the church. The substitute prevailed.

Fourth Ballot.—The tellers returned, and the result of the fourth ballot was announced. Whole number of ballots cast, 139; necessary to a choice, 70. No one having received the requisite number, the Bishop declared that there was no election and another vote was taken, and the tellers retired to count the ballots.

The Twenty-Eighth Question:—"Who are selected to be the Triers of Appeals?" was called. The following were nominated and elected: H. J. Boatman, T. W. McVety, H. D. Clark, C. W. Ayling, R. B. Williams, G. J. Luckey, and B. W. Baker.

The Tenth Question:—"What Local Preachers have been elected Deacons?" was called.

The following, being properly recommended, having passed examination, and after representation by their respective Presiding Elders, were elected Deacons: David F. Wilson, James J. Hunter, William F. Dudman, Samuel Albrecht, Philias A. St. John, Josiah B. Bartle, Edward W. Thompson.

The Second Question:—"Who are Admitted on Trial?" was called. The certificates of recommendation of the following were presented, their standing reported by the committee of examination, and after representation by their respective Presiding Elders, they were admitted on trial: J. J. Hunter, W. F. Dudman, F. W. Imboden, B. F. Stull, Franklin Rist and E. W. Thompson.

John H. Wood was not admitted, but, on motion of J. S. Cumming, the Presiding Elder was authorized to employ him as a supply.

On motion the Presiding Elder was permitted to withdraw the name of Thomas C. Davis.

Fifth and Sixth Ballots.—During this work on question No. 2, the tellers twice reported the result of ballots taken for general conference delegates, neither of which resulted in an election, and a seventh ballot was taken.

Letter of Sympathy.—On motion of R. Haney G. R. Palmer was requested to write a letter of sympathy to Henderson Ritchie.

T. J. Robinson, Lay Delegate to the general Conference, was introduced.

The Eighteenth Question was recalled, and M. C. Eignus was granted a supernumerary relation.

The Stewards made their preliminary report, which was approved.

On motion of R. Haney G. B. Snedaker was made the custodian of the money due George W. Brown.

Standing of Candidates.—G. R. Palmer presented a resolution relating to the standing of candidates, which was adopted. (See Resolution.)

Insurance.—J. G. Evans presented a resolution relating to the insurance of church property, which was adopted. (See Resolution.)

Bills.—The statistical secretary presented a bill of one dollar for stationery, which was allowed and ordered paid from the Minute fund.

T. J. Wood, committee on blanks, presented a bill of \$5.65, which was allowed and ordered paid from the Minute fund.

Introduced.—E. G. Smith, of the American Bible Society, was introduced.

Dr. J. C. Hartzell, Secretary of the Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society, addressed the Conference.

W. B. Frazell addressed the Conference in the interest of the school at Demorest, Ga.

The Bishop addressed the Conference on the work of the Church in the South.

P. A. Cool.—It was announced that P. A. Cool is to take charge of the Wiley University at Marshall, Texas, and he briefly addressed the Conference. On motion of R. Haney a collection was ordered taken for Brother Cool, which, when counted, was found to amount to \$106.82.

Resolutions.—On motion, M. A. Head, Thos. Doney and B. F. Tallman were appointed a committee to draft suitable resolutions respecting the departing brethren of our Conference.

Expense of Delegate.—G. J. Luckey moved that the expense of the delegate to the Ecumenical Conference at Washington, D. C., be paid from the Minute fund.

G. R. Palmer moved as a substitute that the pastors take a collection in their respective charges to defray the delegate's expenses. The substitute prevailed.

Statistical Reports.—On motion of J. D. Calhoun the Conference instructed the Committee on Blanks to distribute Neal's Climax Statistical Cards the coming year.

The Bill of Aaron Bower for \$3.35 for Veterans' Day circulars was allowed and ordered paid from the Minute fund.

On motion it was decided that when the Conference adjourn it adjourn to meet at 2 p. m. to-day for Memorial Services.

The Nineteenth Question was recalled, and the relation of A. S. Atherton was changed from superannuated to supernumerary.

G. W. Gue was appointed to lead the devotional exercises this afternoon and B. W. Baker on Monday morning.

Announcements were made, the Doxology was sung, and Dr. J. C. Hartzell pronounced the Benediction.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference convened at 2 p. m. with Dr. R. Hancy in the chair.

Devotional exercises were conducted by G. W. Gue.

On motion of M. C. Bowlin it was decided that the Monday morning session shall begin at 8. a. m.

Memorial Services.—The order of the day was taken up, and the Conference proceeded with the Memorial Services.

R. N. Morse.—G. R. Palmer read a memoir of R. N. Morse, and J. G. Evans spoke feelingly of the deceased.

Wm. Matheny.—J. W. Denning read a memoir of Wm. Matheny, after which M. V. B. White spoke many kind words concerning the life and character of the deceased.

Mrs. Price.—A memoir of Mrs. Margaret Price was read by J. A. Johnson, and Lewis Springer followed with a short address.

On motion the time of the Conference Love Feast was fixed for 9 a. m. to-morrow.

Announcements were made, the Doxology was sung, and A. C. Price pronounced the Benediction.

FIFTH DAY.

MORNING SESSION.

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 14, 1891.

Conference convened at 8 A. M. G. R. Palmer in the chair. Devotional exercises were conducted by B. W. Baker.

Examinations.—A resolution relating to Conference examinations was read and adopted. (See resolution).

Reports.—The report of the committee on Bible Cause was read and adopted, also that of the committee to canvass the Lay Electoral Vote.

The Conference Stewards were instructed to place J. A. Windsor in the fourth class of claimants, and were granted the privilege to retire.

Missionary Society.—The officers and managers of the Conference Missionary Society were nominated and elected. (See list.)

On motion the collection taken yesterday was ordered divided between Mrs. Wm. Matheny and Mrs. R. N. Morse.

C. F. Middleton.—On motion J. W. Haney was instructed to write a letter of sympathy to C. F. Middleton.

Reports.—The report of the committee on the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society was read and recommitted; also the report of the committee on Sanctity of the Sabbath.

The report of the committee on Epworth League was read and adopted.

State Epworth League Convention.—On motion the Secretary was instructed to notify the Rock River, Illinois and Southern Illinois Conferences of our action concerning a State Epworth League Convention and ask their co-operation.

Reports.—The report of the committee on Education was read and after representations of Hedding College by Dr. J. G. Evans, of Illinois Wesleyan University by B. W. Baker, and of Grand Prairie Seminary by Dr. S. Van Pelt, was adopted.

Children's Home Society.—Rev. G. K. Hoover, of Rock River Conference, was introduced and addressed the Conference in the interests of the Children's Home Society and a committee consisting of V. C. Randolph, B. W. Baker and J. W. Haney was appointed to consider the matter and report.

The Bishop came in and took the chair.

Certificate of Votes.—The following certificate was placed on file by the Secretary:

Certificate of Ordination.—The Bishop filed with the Secretary the following Certificate of Ordination:

CASE 1. At a Quarterly Conference held in Chillicothe, and for the Chillicothe charge, June 8, 1891, when the question, "Who are the Trustees of the Church Property," was asked, a sister of the church, Mrs. Deborah Thorne by name, was nominated; the President of the Quarterly Conference ruled the motion or nomination out of order, on the ground that women are not eligible to the office of Trustee in the Methodist Episcopal church, whereupon Benjamin F. Warren, a member of said Quarterly Conference dissented from the above ruling and appealed therefrom to the President of the Annual Conference.

Above decision sustained.

CASE SECOND.—On the same charge and at the same time and place, when the question "Who shall Serve as Delegate to the Lay Electoral Conference?" was asked, Mrs. Mary E. Clapp was nominated; the President of the Quarterly Conference ruled the motion out of order on the ground that the candidate named was not eligible to the office, the question of the admission of women as such delegates being one of the branches of the question now pending in the church. Benjamin F. Warren, differing in opinion from the ruling, appealed to the President of the Annual Conference.

The revised report of the committee on Woman's Foreign Missionary Society was presented and adopted.

Nominations were made for officers and additional members of the Church Extension Society and they were elected. (See List).

The report of the committee on Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society was read and adopted.

On motion of R. Haney it was decided that when we adjourn, we adjourn to meet at 2 o'clock to-day.

Wiley University.—A resolution was adopted relating to a memorial alcove in Wiley University. (See Resolution.)

On motion the Bishop was requested to appoint P. A. Cool President of Wiley University.

Stewards' Report.—The Stewards made their final report and distributed the Conference funds.

The Bishop appointed Dr. J. G. Evans to preside at the afternoon session, and J. P. Forsyth to conduct the devotional services.

Change of Relation.—The relation of G. R. Palmer and C. W. Green was changed from supernumerary to effective.

The Doxology was sung and G. W. Gue pronounced the Benediction.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference convened at 2 p. m., J. G. Evans in the chair. Devotional services were led by J. P. Forsyth.

Reports.—The reports of the committees on Post offices and Episcopal Fund were read and adopted.

The committee on the Use of Tobacco reported. On motion of H. K. Metcalf the report was amended by striking out the third item of the preamble and the report as amended was adopted.

The reports of the committees on Book Accounts and Periodicals, Church Extension and Children's Home Society were read and adopted.

The report of the committee on the State of the Church was presented. A. K. Tullis moved to amend the report by striking out the item relating to State Educational Institutions. After some discussion the previous question was ordered and the amendment prevailed. The report as amended was adopted.

The report on the Woman's Home Missionary Society was read and adopted.

The report of the Legacy Committee was read and on motion was laid on the table.

The Officers and Managers of the Freedmen's Aid Society were nominated and elected. (See List.)

The report of the committee on Temperance and Constitutional Prohibition was read and adopted.

The Treasurer made a supplementary report.

Resolutions Relating to Veterans' Day, Apportionment for Conference Claimants, Epworth League Chapters, Minute Publisher, Brethren departing from the Conference, and our Entertainment in Moline were offered and adopted. (See Resolutions.)

A resolution relating to the time of holding our Annual Conference was laid on the table.

The Statistical Secretary made a verbal report which was accepted.

Roll Call for Minutes.—On motion of G. J. Luckey the Minute Agent was permitted to call the roll for subscriptions to the Minutes.

Conference History.—On motion it was ordered that the paper prepared by the Committee on Conference History be published in the Minutes.

Bishop Joyce came in and took the Chair.

On motion the Secretary was permitted to insert the portrait of the Bishop and a cut of the first M. E. church in Moline in the Minutes.

Transfer.—The Bishop announced the transfer of D. B. Johnson, a Deacon of the Second Class, from the Austin Conference.

Change of Relation.—On motion of M. A. Head the relation of T. H. Pryor was changed from supernumerary to effective.

Re-Admitted.—On motion W. C. Knapp was re-admitted on his certificate of location.

Committees of Examination.—The Bishop announced the committees of examination and Boards of Church location. (See Lists.)

The Minute Agent called the roll and took subscriptions for the Minutes.

A resolution of esteem for Bishop Joyce was adopted by a rising vote. (See Resolution.)

Memoir.—On motion of N. T. Allen, it was ordered that the memoir of D. H. Kreidler be published in this year's Minutes.

The Journal of the Saturday and Monday sessions was read and approved.

Admitted on Trial.—On motion the action of the Conference in the case of Thomas C. Davis was re-considered, and on motion of M. A. Head he was admitted on trial.

The Bishop led in prayer and addressed the Conference.

On motion it was ordered that when the appointments are read we stand adjourned without date.

Bishop Joyce read the appointments and after the Doxology was sung, pronounced the Benediction.

MINUTES OF CENTRAL ILLINOIS LAY ELECTORAL CONFERENCE HELD IN MO-
LINE SEPT. 11, 1891.

The Central Illinois Lay Electoral Conference convened in the First Baptist Church in Moline, Ill., at 9 A. M. Sept. 11th, 1891, and was called to order by H. Augustine.

After singing and prayer W. C. Galloway was elected Temporary President and C. R. Tombaugh Temporary Secretary.

On motion the chairman appointed the following Committee on Credentials: H. Augustine, H. A. Lodge, C. E. Alford, W. F. Crawford, T. M. Kelley.

Rev. J. W. Haney was introduced, and, on behalf of the Ministerial Conference, invited the Lay Electoral Conference to visit them in a body.

Moved and carried that the invitation be accepted.

On motion the chairman was instructed to extend an invitation to Bishop Joyce to visit and address the Lay Conference.

Ordered that the Conference at ten o'clock take a recess until eleven o'clock in order to accept the invitation to attend the Ministerial Conference.

Ordered that a committee of three be appointed on Permanent Organization. The chair appointed as such committee Adam Bruner, Nathan Giles, W. B. Rickey.

On motion the chair appointed the following Committee on Resolutions:

Alfred Mead, J. H. Bunn, Isaac Bailey.

The Conference took a recess for the purpose of visiting the Ministerial Conference.

The Conference reassembled at 11.15 A. M., with Temporary President Galloway in the chair.

After singing, various announcements were made, and the report of the Committee on Credentials was received. A motion to amend the report by adding thereto the names of three ladies bearing proper certificates of election as delegates, but whose admission had been referred by the committee to the Conference because of a question of eligibility, was lost, and the report adopted as presented.

Moved and seconded that the question of admission of the ladies to seats in the Conference be referred to the Bishop and his cabinet. After considerable discussion the previous question was ordered and the motion lost.

Ordered that a recess be taken until two o'clock.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Conference reconvened at two o'clock.

After singing and prayer, it was ordered that in the further discussion under the temporary organization no member be allowed to speak to a motion more than once. Moved and seconded that those ladies bearing proper credentials be admitted to seats in the Conference. Discussed at length. Previous question ordered, and the motion prevailed by a vote of 61 to 31.

On motion the temporary organization was made permanent.

Ordered that the Conference proceed to the election of delegates to the general Conference.

W. A. Hanson, D. H. Gray, L. S. Straight, W. H. Logan, J. M. Sweeny, W. B. Riekey, T. J. Robinson, G. A. Metzger, Geo. B. Morgan and Milton Hicks were placed in nomination. The name of D. H. Gray was withdrawn. Moved that the four candidates having the lowest number of votes be dropped after the informal ballot. Motion laid on the table.

A. R. Wykoff, J. T. Noftsker, T. G. Morris were appointed tellers.

Moved and seconded that the delegates chosen to represent this Conference be instructed to vote in favor of the admission of women as members of the General Conference. Motion prevailed.

Ordered that the first ballot be informal; that all future discussion be limited to three minute speeches, and that a line be drawn assigning visitors seats in one of the wings of the church. The informal ballot resulted as follows: Hanson, 13; Straight, 3; Logan, 35; Sweeny, 8; Riekey, 28; Robinson, 50; Metzger, 8; Morgan, 8; Hicks, 61. Straight withdrew his name. Resolved, That this Lay Electoral Conference expresses its strongest disapproval of any and all movements which might assist in destroying the sanctity of the Sabbath as we have it, and

Resolved, secondly, That we earnestly desire that the Commissioners of our World's Fair may not open the Columbian Exposition on the Sabbath day.

On motion a vote of thanks was tendered to the chairman for his impartial rulings.

CHURCH EXTENSION.

To the Central Illinois Conference:

The Board of Church Extension of the Methodist Episcopal Church makes general statement of the work of twenty-five years.

The organization of this work, though directed by the General Conference of 1864, was not completed until the latter part of 1865, and the work really began in 1866, so that its first quarter of a century closes in this year of our Lord, 1891.

During this period the Board has collected and disbursed in round numbers, (the exact figures change daily,) - - - - -

\$4,250,000 00

Of this, the General Fund, derived chiefly from collections, but including special gifts for *Frontier Churches*, \$250 each, and *Mountain Fund* specials of \$100 each, contained a little less than two-thirds, for use by donations to churches, or - - - - -

\$2,750,000 00

The Loan Fund contains a *permanent capital* of - \$750,000 00

And churches borrowing from it have returned an equal amount, - - - - -

\$750,000 00 \$1,500,000 00

Making the aggregate above given, - - - \$4,250,000 00

With this the Board has aided 7,700 churches, more than one-third of the entire number owned by our Church.

Our Conference has shared in this work as follows:

It is manifest that the efficiency and value of the Loan Fund depend upon the fidelity and promptness of churches, borrowing from it, in meeting their obligations. To fail in this is a most serious fault, which the Board in Philadelphia, as the custodians of the Fund, should not, under any circumstances permit. We urge our churches to meet every obligation with the strictest fidelity.

Christianity in Earnest, being issued every two months, gives fresh and valuable information concerning Church Extension and suggestive discussions of this and kindred subjects. It is a great help to the pastors, and a larger circulation among our people, especially our official members, would promote the interest of this cause.

Glad Tidings, with its service of song and condensed information, is pre-eminently adapted for a Church Extension service in every Church and Sunday-school. We cordially recommend its use in taking the Annual Collections.

Church architecture has been greatly improved under the auspices of the Board, and we earnestly advise all who contemplate building, to avail themselves of the facilities which the Board has to offer.

In organizing new Churches, and in taking titles to Church property, there should be great care to conform to the laws of the State and the discipline of the Church. The necessary information is now accessible to all in the book on *Laws and Forms for Churches*, prepared by the Corresponding Secretary, Dr. A. J. Kynett. This, and the necessary blank forms can be obtained of him.

We recommend for adoption the following Resolutions:

1. We congratulate the Church upon the great work accomplished by our Board of Church Extension, and commend it to the enlarged liberality of all our people.

2. The fact that our country is new, that our population doubles in less than thirty years, so that within another quarter of a century we shall exceed an hundred millions of people, and that the powers of evil are intensely active, demand that the work of Church Extension shall be greatly enlarged in the quarter of a century to come.

3. We will not be content until, in the enlargement of this work under the direction of the General Committee and Board of Church Extension, we shall fully perform the part assigned us as a Conference.

4. In order to do this we will, in our several appointments, avail ourselves of the helps provided by the Board, in *Christianity in Earnest* and *Glad Tidings*, and will endeavor to lead all our Churches to respond in full to the call made upon them in pursuance of the plans of the discipline.

Reports of Standing Committees.

EDUCATION.

The Committee on Education respectfully reports as follows:

GARRETT BIBLICAL INSTITUTE.

This School of the Prophets has had an appreciable advancement over all previous years. The registration shows 196 students, 38 of whom were graduated last May. Of these graduates two will enter the missionary field.

We record with profound sorrow the death of the Rev. C. W. Bennett, D.D., LL. D., and commend the appointment of Rev. C. J. Little, D. D., LL. D., as his successor.

The new school year will begin September 17, under most promising auspices.

We recommend the appointment of J. W. Frizzelle, A. M. B. D., and Rev. T. W. McVety, A. M. B. D., as Conference visitors.

DE PAUW SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY.

With pleasure we learn of the excellent advantages, and widening influence of this Institution; and most cheerfully recommend it to the confidence and patronage of those who seek a valuable theological training. We suggest Rev. B. W. Baker and Rev. S. VanPelt as Conference visitors.

NORTHWESTERN UNIVERSITY.

This institution is the most largely endowed Methodist University in the world, and has the largest number of students. It has 112 instructors, and had last year 1960 students enrolled.

It has a College of Liberal Arts and a Preparatory school at Evanston, and Colleges of Law, Medicine, Dentistry and Pharmacy in Chicago.

The Law School has been re-organized and enlarged until it now equals the best in the land. The University during the past year has received an addition to its already large endowment, the sum of three hundred thousand dollars. The whole church is to be congratulated upon possessing so great a University. We recommend the appointment of Rev. J. W. Haney as Trustee for the ensuing year.

GRAND PRAIRIE SEMINARY.

This Conference Seminary has for years done splendid work for christian education in Eastern Illinois. In December Dr. McClish resigned the Presidency and was transferred to the California Conference and Rev. S. Van Pelt, D. D., was elected his successor. The steady growth of the school is unchecked. The receipts from tuition for the past year were \$6566.00, being \$1163.61 more than the previous year; and the enrollment of the first two days of the present term, opening September, 9, was 152, as against 111 of the same time last year. Steam heating apparatus has been placed in the main building, and other extensive improvements made. A two story brick building to contain a chapel to seat 700, a society hall, seven music rooms and art rooms, is to be enclosed this fall and completed before June commencement. The cost will be about \$8000.00, \$5000.00 of which is already secured. We recommend the generous co-operation of the ministers and people in providing the means for these improvements.

The financial condition is good, after paying increased salaries and meeting all current expenses of the year, there remained about \$200.00 in the Treasury. Bequests of several thousand dollars have been made to the school, and there is reason to expect other bequests in the near future.

The Seminary has eight teachers. Of the 313 students of last year, 212 were in the literary departments, such as Classical, Scientific and Normal; the remainder in Musical and Commercial studies. Important improvements have been made in the working outfit of the school.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. S. VanPelt, D. D., President, and Rev. C. E. Pickett, Professor in the Seminary.

We also recommend the appointment of Revs. T. W. McVety, J. H. Scott, R. B. Williams, A. K. Tullis, J. E. Mercer and E. G. Cattermole, as Conference visitors.

We request the appointment of G. R. Palmer, as Financial Agent of the Seminary for the coming year.

HEDDING COLLEGE.

Hedding College has entered upon a year of unprecedented prosperity. The number of students has been nearly doubled, the current expenses have been provided for, the College property deeded back to the trustees, and a friend proposes the erection of a \$50,000 Memorial hall, while in his will he makes provision for a generous endowment.

We recognize and appreciate the energetic and judicious administration of Dr. Evans.

The heartiest thanks of this Conference are hereby extended to Hon. Thomas Newell for his gift of the College property. While to the very generous gentleman who by his munificence has assured the future of "Hedding" we cannot be too profoundly grateful.

Resolved, That C. W. Ayling be elected trustee for two years, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of P. A. Cool.

That we request the Bishop to appoint C. W. Green, Financial Secretary of Hedding College.

ILLINOIS WESLEYAN UNIVERSITY.

The report of this most excellent University shows it to have enjoyed the most prosperous year in its history.

The increase in the College of Letters over the preceding year, was 35 for the Fall term, 41 for the Winter term and 37 for the Spring term. The income from tuition was \$1700.00 more than for any previous year. The building and grounds have been improved and beautified at an outlay of \$8000.00. The Museum has been moved into new quarters and the specimens remounted at a cost of \$1000.00.

The Faculty of the College of Letters has been greatly strengthened by calling Robert Benson Steele, A. M. Ph. D., (Johns Hopkins) to the chair of Latin. All departments of the University are flourishing. The College of Law ranks with the best in the west. The College of Music and Art School are unsurpassed. The Post Graduate and Non-Resident department is widening the name and fame of the institution throughout the college world. The outlook of the University was never so hopeful as now. Twenty thousand of the twenty-five thousand dollars to meet Dr. Buck's gift has been raised, and we are hopeful that the condition will be met.

We recommend as Trustees, Judge O. T. Reeves, Dr. D. T. Douglas, J. B. Ayres and Samuel Van Pelt, D. D. And as visitors, Thomas Doney, J. W. Frizzelle, Richard Crewes, John H. Scott, M. V. Crumbaker and R. B. Williams. We also request the Bishop to re-appoint Rev. B. W. Baker as Financial Agent.

Resolved, That we endorse the movement to unify the educational benevolence so that all funds raised to assist needy students shall be administered by the parent Board.

Resolved, That our Conference Educational Society be suspended until further action by this Conference.

We recommend that each Pastor hold an Educational Meeting in each charge in the interests of our own schools, not to take collections, but for the specific purpose of making the people acquainted with the facilities for Christian Education in these schools.

We further recommend that the College Presidents or Agents of our schools prepare programmes for these meetings.

We recognize the merits and approve the methods of the Educational Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church and highly appreciate the excellent services of Rev. C. H. Payne, D. D., LL. D., as Secretary of the society.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND TRACTS.

We are devoutly thankful to God for the prosperity of the Sunday Schools in our Conference. Especially do we rejoice in the increase of the schools and the increased number of conversions in the schools.

But that which gives us most hope and encouragement is the fact that there were over 103,000 conversions in the Sabbath Schools of the M. E. Church.

We recognize the blessed work being done by the Tract Society of our Church. About 15,000,000 pages of pure, instructive, Christian literature have been circulated during the past year.

Resolved, 1. That we renew our pledge of support and will do our best to raise our apportionments.

Resolved, 2. That we recommend all our pastors to avail themselves of the offer of tracts to the value of one-half the amount of collections taken for this fund.

Resolved, That we earnestly exhort one another in the ministry to faithfully stand by the declarations of our Conference and the laws of the Church, and that we affectionately appeal to those who have not so pledged themselves to adopt, for the sake of the influence of the ministry in general, the Pauline method of self-sacrifice, as stated in 1 Cor. 8, 9:13, "But take heed lest by any means this liberty of yours become a stumbling block to them that are weak. For if any man see thee which hast knowledge sit at meat in the idol's temple, shall not the conscience of him that is weak be emboldened to eat those things which are offered to idols; and through thy knowledge shall the weak brother perish, for whom Christ died? But when ye sin so against the brethren, and wound their weak conscience, ye sin against Christ. Wherefore, if meat make my brother to offend, I will eat no flesh while the world standeth, lest I make my brother to offend;" and

Resolved, That our younger brethren of the Conference be requested to keep their solemn promise, and that a failure to do so be considered a bar to the passage of their ministerial character; and

Resolved, That we will urge our brethren of the laity to assist us by precept and example in the work of teaching our young people the evils of this habit.

With gratitude to God we rejoice in the prosperity of the Methodist Book Concern, having built up a business of \$48,000,000 during the first ninety-eight years of its existence, being \$20,000,000 more than all other Protestant denominational publishing houses in our land. While the last eleven years have added the magnificent sum of \$19,638,000 to the business, or nearly 50 per cent of all the previous years.

Our Sunday-school literature is circulated by 3,304,000 pages, while steps are being taken by our agents to supply the growing demands of that hopeful infant in the Methodist family of only two summers, the Epworth League.

Much is being done to meet every demand of Missions, Church Extension, Bible Cause, Temperance and other reforms of Church and Country, and last but not least by the great reduction in the prices of the books of our own publishing, thereby inducing preachers and people to read our own books rather than the publications of other houses.

As the result and fruit of the above prosperity we rejoice in the growing dividends to the superannuates and families of deceased ministers in our Church, the aggregate amount this year being \$110,000, the share of our Conference amounting to \$1,765; therefore

Resolved, That we heartily endorse the wise and successful management of our Book Agents.

That we will as far as practicable patronize our own publishing houses. That we will supply our Sunday-schools with Methodist books, papers and helps so far as possible in preference to other publications.

That we regard with pleasure the able editorial management of our Advocate family, especially do we approve of the manly, fearless and faithful editor of our own Northwestern Christian Advocate, Rev. Arthur Edwards, D. D.

That in the Epworth Herald we recognize a true and faithful exponent of the motto of the Epworth League in its weekly, sprightly, spicy, "Look Up, Lift Up," it brings to its readers, and that we will do all in our power to increase its circulation, and will welcome its editor, Rev. J. M. Berry, D. D., in our midst at any future time.

That in Rev. J. W. Mendenhall, D. D., we recognize one of the ablest scholars, philosophical thinkers and profound writers on higher criticism of our times, being as editor of the Methodist Review, the right man in the right place.

That we regard the efforts of our Missionary, Church Extension, Freedmen's Aid and Board of Education Secretaries to distribute and circulate freely among our people such periodical and other literature as will bring the facts connected with their respective departments within the reach of all, as wise and timely, and especially do we recommend the wider circulation of the "Gospel in all Lands," and "World Wide Missions."

We commend the Methodist press for its strong, fearless and persistent advocacy of total abstinence to the individual and legal prohibition to the state, the common school system, higher education, the Sabbath reform, closing the Columbian Exposition on Sunday and all other great moral questions of the present day.

SANCTITY OF THE SABBATH.

Corporations and individuals, not excepting members and such ministers of the Church of God as ride upon the trains on the holy day, are apparently growing more indifferent toward the sanctity of the Sabbath, as defined by the Church and the Word of God.

If the Sabbath is to be preserved as a day of worship and of rest, it must be compelled by the united and consistent effort of the Church.

We speak in the name of God and as the representatives of the thirty thousand Methodists in Central Illinois. We speak in the interests of our holy Christianity; and with the desire to secure the Sabbath as a day of rest for toilers, and of undisturbed worship for the Christian Church. We speak to secure the perpetuity of our nation. We concur in the following recommendations:

1. We solemnly protest against the opening of the gates of the World's Fair on the Lord's day for purposes of exhibition, and urge all our members to refrain from attending on that day. We request the Hon. Charles H. Deere, of Moline, as a director of the World's Fair, to use his great influence in closing the Exposition on the Sabbath day.

2. We urge all our members to greater strictness in the observance of the Sabbath. As your pastors, we positively believe that buying and selling, particularly articles of food, riding for pleasure, visiting, patronizing railroads, and the like, on the Sabbath, is sinful, and no man who does these things can preserve Christian character.

3. We will support the American Sabbath Union and all other just measures—persuasive and coercive—in an effort to increase a holy respect for this day, and call upon our Church papers to continue to speak in no uncertain sound.

As ministers, we will preach upon the sanctity of the Sabbath at least twice during the year, and we will ourselves remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy.

FREEDMEN'S AID AND SOUTHERN EDUCATION SOCIETY.

We are delighted with the facts of evident progress submitted to the Church in the twenty-fifth annual report of the Freedmen's Aid Society for our consideration.

The Society is a marvel in the growth of splendid Christian achievement. The statistics, noting its progress, are most encouraging. Receipts from all sources last year are \$322,656.44, the same being a net increase of \$56,008.44 over any preceding year in the history of the Society. But the wealth of heart, intellect and soul, growing out of this transformation of men, cannot be written out in any form of human expression.

The scope of the work, including, as it does, the white and colored populations of the South, and giving them opportunities of education, and also insuring Christian leadership among the masses for the next generation, is worthy of careful examination, and ought to stimulate the generosity of our Church.

We have forty-one institutions, with 330 teachers, 9,310 students in attendance and property worth \$1,800,800 in the midst of thirty annual Conferences and 450,000 members. A large proportion of these schools are doing academic work—laying the foundations of future greatness.

Next to the federation of the Church itself, is the federation of her academic and collegiate institutions. This federation will assure unity, breadth and effectiveness to the educational work of our Church. We rejoice that the Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society of our Church is leading off in a practical demonstration of this idea, and

WHEREAS, The eternal welfare of souls in our South-land largely depends on the intelligent presentation of God's truth, and that for this end a Christian education for the leaders of the masses is indispensable, and

WHEREAS, The ballot in the hands of illiterate voters, white or black, North or South, is a menace to the perpetuity of our civil institutions; therefore

Resolved, 1st. That as a Conference we recommend the prayerful co-operation of all within the bounds of our territory, with the Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society in its work.

Resolved, 2d. We commend the Christian Educator to our brethren as a magazine of intelligent information on the subject of our work of Southern Education.

Resolved, 3d. We suggest a broad scattering of literature in our charges on this subject, and that the fourth Sunday in November be

given to the interests of this work, and that a collection be taken to promote the interests of this cause, and that all charges not having celebrated the Quarter Centennial Jubilee, will do so, Dr. Hartzell promising to furnish programmes and literature.

We are especially glad to greet our beloved Secretary, Dr. Hartzell, in his home Conference, and to note his continued devotion and enthusiasm in this work, and pray he may be spared many years for work.

EPISCOPAL FUND.

Your committee on Episcopal Fund have examined the statistics of the year just closing and find that many of the pastors seem to have ignored the requirements of the Discipline, either by not raising the claim, or by failing to divide *pro rata*, as required by paragraph 287.

The amount contributed this past year is \$1,435, being an increase of \$225 over the previous year but still leaving a deficit of \$511.

The amount apportioned to this Conference for the coming year is \$2284, which is about one and a half per cent of the probable claims for ministerial support, and if the provisions of the Discipline are carefully observed, can be easily raised.

We also suggest that those pastors who are frequently deficient in bringing up this claim, try the disciplinary provision of forwarding quarterly the amount due on this claim.

STATE OF CHURCH.

We are grateful to Almighty God for the prosperity that has attended the labors of our ministers and members during the past year. We recognize the important fact that the mission of the church is the salvation of souls and that the first great work of the church is to lead the unsaved to Christ. Hence we rejoice at the revival spirit in the churches and praise God for the large number of conversions reported, and yet we feel that this revival interest ought to be more general. A smaller number of charges than ever before report "no conversions," but a large majority of the conversions have been in a comparatively small number of charges, while a small number is reported from a large majority of the churches. We suggest and urge that during the coming year revival work be made a specialty in all the churches and that fervent prayer be offered for the outpouring of the spirit, the quickening of the Churches and the awakening conviction and conversion of sinners.

We also rejoice in the material prosperity of our people and of the churches. In the good providence of God the wealth of our country, in which our people largely share, has rapidly increased and many of our people have shown their appreciation of God's material blessings by increased liberality. New churches and parsonages, more in harmony with the demands of the times and contributing to the comfort of people and pastors, have been erected and furnished; the benevolences, notably that for the cause of missions, have received a marked increase from the contributions of the people and the salaries of pastors have been more

generally met with promptness. These facts are indications of a well sustained spirituality and of a strong conviction of moral obligation.

But we would not conceal the fact that there is much formality in the church and many members who come far short of their obligations in the use of God's material blessings. Money making is too often associated with a miserly spirit which hoards the riches which ought to be used for the advancement of Christ's kingdom and we fear there are some whose profession of Christ is not accompanied with a heart experience and spiritual life. Our people need instruction along the line of systematic benevolence and we cannot be too zealous in impressing upon them the great need of spirituality as the one essential requisite for successful work.

The interest manifested in christian education is such as to warrant the expectation that future Methodism within our bounds will be greatly benefitted by the influence and power of sanctified learning. We hail with rejoicing the extensive organization of the Epworth League with its wise combination of christian work and literary culture. The gratifying fruits already apparent, we are glad to believe, are only the beginning of the wonderful blessings that are to come to the church and the world from this organization of our young people for work and culture along the lines of christian obligation and thought.

We are highly gratified at the prominence given to christian culture in the institutions of learning under our patronage. It is a matter for devout thanksgiving that these institutions have been centers of revival influence. More than eighty per cent of the literary students in our three church schools, during the past year, went out Christian young men and women.

Our people cannot afford to educate their children in colleges that give but little or no attention to the inculcation of religious principles and doctrines, and whose students are left without proper oversight and moral restraint. Indeed the church schools of our country are the best and safest schools in the land, and there are none better than those of our church. While rejoicing in the prosperity of Christian colleges under the patronage of other churches, we insist that loyalty to our church should lead our people to patronize our own schools and thereby secure to our young people the advantages of an education under influences that will strengthen their love for Methodism and fit them for cheerful, enthusiastic and successful work in harmony with the doctrines and usages of our church, instead of being alienated by their surroundings from the church of their parents. We are glad to know that the schools under our patronage are worthy, both as to thoroughness of work and safety of environment, of our unreserved support and the future usefulness of our church will be greatly enhanced by a conscientious loyalty to our own schools.

WHEREAS, We have entered upon an era of unparalleled religious activity among the young, and

WHEREAS, This activity has culminated in Methodism in the marvelous organization known as the Epworth League, therefore

Resolved, 1. That we recognize in this movement the hand of the great Head of the Church directing to a success hitherto unattained and unattainable apart from the enlisted energies of the young people of our churches, for we remember that while the old are for counsel, the young are for war.

2. That we congratulate this Conference upon the inspiring reports presented at the present session from the different districts, which aggregate 180 Leagues with over 7400 members, being in fact nearly a league for every charge within the bounds of our territory.

3. That we heartily concur in the suggestion of a National Epworth League Convention where our magnificent young people's society may properly exhibit to the world at large its vast strength and where a strong impetus may be gained in the development of this great arm of our power. We also strongly recommend that a state convention be held in the near future that shall adequately represent the Epworth League in the great state of Illinois.

4. That we urge upon all our brethren the importance of organizing Junior Leagues where the boys and girls may be suitably trained up for active service in the Epworth League.

5. That we recommend that in the future as in the past, a day be set apart at all our Camp Meetings, to be observed as Epworth League Day and that both on these days and also at our district and sub-district conventions, training classes be organized for the instruction of our young people in the best methods of League work. We also recommend the organization of a Conference League. Further we nominate Amer M. Stocking as the representative from the Seventh District for the Board of Control for the ensuing year.

6. That we endorse the Epworth Herald as the official organ of the League, and will commend it to our people as an able and faithful exponent of the spirit and life of this great movement. We also urge that the authorities in our several colleges make each college paper the local official organ of the Epworth League within its patronizing territory, thus bringing the young people into closer affiliation with its interests and work.

Presiding Elders' Reports.

GALESBURG DISTRICT.

With gratitude to God I make this my annual report to you of the work on Galesburg District. In many respects we have had a year of more than common prosperity, though not altogether without trials.

We have thirty-five charges. To all of them, except two, Bishop Merrill sent pastors from the Conference. After Conference I supplied Ellison circuit by Charles Holmes and Ellisville circuit by James J. Hunter.

In February Joseph E. Williams, pastor of Oquawka circuit, failed because of nervous prostration, and was compelled to retire from the charge, and I supplied the place by A. P. Rolen, a student in Hedding College, who has done good work, and reports his collections "all taken and all full."

About the same time W. R. Warner, pastor of Good Hope circuit, also failed in health and left the work, and I supplied the place by W. H. Cooper, a supernumerary member of this Conference, who has brought up full collections, and reports a new parsonage nearly ready for occupancy.

We have had Revivals in all but three of the charges. We held two Camp Meetings, one at Spring Creek, in McDonough county, the other at Gilson, in Knox county, each of which was a great blessing to the large number of members attending, many of whom sought, and, I trust, found, the blessing of Perfect Love. At each sinners were converted. It was quite generally claimed that these were more spiritual than any Camp Meetings held on the district for several years. In all we have had 1,204 conversions.

The salaries of the pastors were fixed at about the same figures as last year, and while there are some deficiencies, I think, from reports made to me, they are more nearly paid than they were last year.

We have made advancement in benevolences. For Missions we were asked to raise \$399 more than we were asked to raise last year—i. e., \$4,389. According to the latest reports from the pastors to me, we have raised \$4,852, which is \$460 more than our apportionment of the "million and a quarter" asked of the Church, and \$776 more than we raised last year.

In most of the charges the provisions of the discipline in reference to Missions have been observed. In some cases the monthly concert for prayer for Missions has been held with good results seen in the collections; in other cases the neglect of this direction of the discipline has been seen in a lack of interest in this great cause. The other benevolences have been advanced in proportion to the advance of the Missionary collections. The collections for Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education and for Conference Claimants have had special attention.

We have had some confusion resulting from the new method of making apportionments. Some months after Conference and months after the meeting of the General Missionary Committee, I was notified of

the amount apportioned to our Conference and to our district. A few weeks after I had sent out apportionments there came another apportionment differing from the first. Then each pastor was notified of his proportion of "the million and a quarter for missions." In some cases the amount named was far below the regular apportionment. In one charge, where there had been a local difficulty last year, resulting in a falling off of about \$35 for Missions, the pastor was informed from New York that if he brought up \$50 he would do his part, which was less by very much than the charge had paid for years, and \$45 less than this year's apportionment. I am glad to report that the pastor has raised his full apportionment, \$135.

There has been much done in building and improving Church and Parsonage property. Churches have been built at Hill's Grove, on Colchester circuit, costing \$1,200; one at Ellisville, costing \$1,800; one at Little York, on Sunbeam circuit, costing \$2,864; also Epworth Chapel, on Pennington Point circuit, costing \$1,400. Besides, many churches have been repaired and beautified at a cost ranging from \$20 up to \$3,000.

Four parsonages are in process of erection—one at Abingdon, costing \$1,600; one at Bentley, to cost \$700; one at Blandinsville, costing \$1,700; one at Good Hope, costing \$1,100. Several Parsonages have been repaired and improved. And in all this building and repairing there has been very little indebtedness incurred. The total amount expended in building and repairing Churches and Parsonages is \$18,331.

We have the Epworth League organized in all but two charges. We have 37 chapters and 1,660 members. Our church literature is more generally taken than in former years. The Advocates, especially the *Northwestern*, are in most of our homes, one charge, Galesburg, taking 105 Advocates.

Hedding College, at Abingdon, Ills., has had prosperity. The President, Dr. Evans, reports a larger attendance than for many years. His report will show the financial condition and prospects of the College.

As directed by the General Conference, the question of the Admission of Women to the Electoral and General Conferences was submitted to a vote of the members of the Church, with the following result:

I have tried faithfully to perform the duties of the high office committed to me, and have not been influenced in my official acts by personal feelings or interest. The year has been one of anxiety and sorrow. For many months our eldest daughter, Mrs. Belle Gilbert, slowly faded away with disease, resulting from la grippe, until the 26th of May, she died. I have found much comfort in the thought that Christ is touched with "a feeling of our infirmities" and my heart has been strengthened by the hearty expressions of sympathy from so many good men and women. I more than ever before appreciate being identified with them in toil and hope.

KANKAKEE DISTRICT.

The Kankakee District has thirty-six Pastoral Charges. Braidwood, Braceville and Gardner had two preachers, and three appointments. The people were greatly dissatisfied with this arrangement, and after three months' trial, I was compelled for the good of the work to supply another preacher. At the end of six months, such was the feeling existing in the several appointments, that to save the work I was compelled to practically divide the charge into three, giving to each town a preacher. At the end of nine months the preacher at Gardner, who was a student at Evanston and claimed to be a member of a Western Conference, unceremoniously left his work. I procured a most excellent supply in the person of B. Frank Stull, who finished the year in good shape.

About the first of January Bro. C. B. Allen, Pastor at Essex, was transferred to the North Nebraska Conference by Bishop Bowman. After a good deal of trouble I procured the services of A. J. Calvert, a student at Evanston, to fill out the year. About the same time Dr. McClish resigned the Presidency of Grand Prairie Seminary. The Board of Trustees elected Dr. Van Pelt, the Pastor at Onarga, to fill the vacancy. I thought myself fortunate in securing Bro. A. R. Morgan, who had recently resigned the Chaplaincy of the Penitentiary at Joliet to fill the vacancy left by Dr. Van Pelt. After about five months his health failed and he asked to be relieved. I then secured Bro. O. Bartholow to supply the charge until Conference.

With these very annoying exceptions the work on the District has been smooth and pleasant. There has been some sickness in the homes of the Pastors, but only one has been entered by the Angel of death. During the winter little Maurice, son of Bro. and Sister Crumbaker took sick and after many days of suffering the Angel came and took him to the Summer Land of Heaven.

The beautiful brick and stone church at Watseka, began a little more than a year ago, has been completed at a cost of about nine thousand dollars. It was dedicated free from debt July 26 and is one of the most beautiful, substantial and convenient churches in the Conference. Too much credit can not be given Bro. L. F. Callom, under whose Pastorate the herculean task was undertaken, and against supposed impossibilities, carried to completion.

The Victor appointment on the Loda charge has also built a new church at a cost of about \$1,700.

Bro. A. M. Lumpkin, Pastor at Piper City and La Hogue, established an appointment in the country, held a protracted meeting, received about thirty members, organized a class and built a church at a cost of about \$2,000. This commendable work, accomplished as it was in one year, speaks well for the Pastor and people, who followed their success by raising a subscription and building a parsonage at Piper City at a cost of about \$1,200.

Bro. J. H. Hobbs, on the McDowell charge, after a gracious revival lasting all winter, is building a new church at the old Avoca appointment which will cost about \$2,000.

Bro. E. G. Cattermole, Pastor at Gilman, received a letter last winter from Bro. Isaac Bailey, a member of his Church then traveling

in the Orient, offering five hundred dollars if he would build a parsonage. With this start Bro. Cattermole raised the money and purchased a neat, and convenient home for the preacher at a cost of \$1,200.

The Crescent City Church, under the care of Bro. B. F. Eckley, has been enlarged by the addition of a room on the side and a tower and vestibule at a cost of about \$1,400, which was the gift of the Egley family, as a memorial offering in the name of the deceased husband and father.

The congregation at Saunemin, under the pastoral supervision of Bro. John Small, has outgrown the church and built a neat addition with vestibule and tower, increasing its conveniences and seating capacity thereby. The cost will be about \$1,600. Other lesser improvements have been made on church property at various places, and more contemplated in the near future.

Grand Prairie Seminary, located at Onarga, has suffered nothing in the change of presidents. Dr. Van Pelt has shown himself to be the right man in the right place, and demonstrated the wisdom of the Trustees in their selection of a successor to the popular Dr. McClish. The report of the trustees will show a healthy increase in the number of students during the past year. The prosperity of this institution has necessitated the erection of an additional building to cost about eight thousand dollars, about five thousand of which has already been secured.

The District Camp Meeting at Watseka was a great blessing to the people and really a feast of tabernacles. The attendance was large, considering the weather, and there were about 22 conversions.

There have been revivals on nearly all the charges and about eleven hundred conversions all told on the District during the year.

The young people and children are being looked after. Sabbath schools are prosperous, Epworth Leagues are being organized in nearly all the charges, there are in the District 40 Leagues and 1,500 members. These are all being carefully trained to work for the Master. The periodical lists have been increased, just how much I can not say. Many *Epworth Heralds* are being circulated.

The directions of the Discipline concerning the benevolences of the Church have been carried out. The District will show an advance all along the line. I think the reports of the pastors will show that we have on missions fully met, and gone beyond the apportionment made by the general apportioning committee, being ten per cent more than the amount raised on the District last year.

I have been pleading all the year for fair play in the collections, and the pastors have ably seconded my efforts and I am persuaded that many of the charges will go on the roll of honor this year.

For all these things we most heartily "Praise God from Whom all Blessings Flow."

PEORIA DISTRICT.

MR. PRESIDENT AND BRETHREN.—It is with pleasure that I offer to you the labor of myself and fellow pastors within the bounds of Peoria District during the twelvemonth which has just reached its close. Last autumn, very unexpectedly to me, I was taken from very pleasant and harmonious surroundings and put in charge of this new field of labor. Filled as it was with grave responsibilities, with fear and trembling I took hold of the task before me. And now, deeply conscious of having come far short of what I had hoped to secure during the year, with devout gratitude to the bountiful Giver of every good and perfect gift, with sincere thanks to my co-laborers who have stood by my side and loyally and royally supported me in all my plans and purposes to enlarge our borders and further the interests of Methodism and the kingdom of God among us, proving themselves indeed true yoke-fellows in the Gospel, I beg leave to submit to your kindly consideration the following facts and record of results.

We have a strip of territory lying mostly on the western bank of the Illinois river, about one hundred and twenty-five miles long by about thirty miles wide, including all of Peoria county, a large portion of Stark and Fulton counties, and smaller portions of Marshall, Knox, Tazewell and Mason counties. Within this field, conveniently located, we have 85 churches valued at about \$260,000, and 31 parsonages valued at about \$38,000, leaving but five or six of the thirty-six appointments without a Methodist preacher's house. We have, perhaps, seventy-five Sunday-schools organized and controlled according to the discipline and usages of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and probably fifteen or twenty others indirectly controlled by the Church, officered and taught by members of our church, but not adopting fully our method of organization. The large majority of all the schools employ the publications of the Methodist Book Concern.

We have thirty-three Epworth Leagues, with a reported membership of 1,443. Besides the Junior Leagues, three children's classes have been reported to me, others doubtless having been overlooked in the reports of the brethren, with a membership of 118.

The thirty-six pastors of the district have realized the responsibility of leading such an organized host, yet, in the midst of some discouragements, as la grippe, in some places, being more violent than one year ago, and here and there entirely preventing the holding of protracted revival meetings, and the inclement winter and, sometimes, impassable roads, rendering usual revival efforts in some sections impossible, with banners aloft they have gone forward and have fought a good fight and won a noble victory. Faith in God, intelligent and persistent toil, and the spirit of genuine self-sacrifice, have done the work. When brethren who have families to support, and who receive not more than \$300 or \$400 for that purpose, yet resolutely and persistently press the benevolent and other claims of the Church, they certainly manifest a most praiseworthy and commendable spirit.

A Chapel, beautiful and commodious, for Sunday School and social meeting purposes, and costing about \$1,000, has been built on the south side in Canton. East Peoria has erected a Church building at a cost of \$2,400, and a Church costing \$1,000 has been completed and dedicated

at Mapleton, on the Glassford charge. Bro. C. W. Ayling has secured \$1,900 in good subscriptions to build a Church at Putnam, on the Henry charge.

One of the best Parsonages in the Conference was completed during the holidays, on the La Prairie Center charge. It is worth not less than \$1,500. Another parsonage, worth about \$1,200, under the judicious management of Pastor J. A. Windsor, has been erected on the Manito charge. At a personal loss in his own salary, and working much of the time beyond his strength, he has built such a house as shall bring upon him the blessing of many a weary itinerant in the years to come. Besides this, negotiations are now pending whereby we hope to secure, in the near future, as a Parsonage, a property worth fully \$4,000.

We have expended, perhaps, \$12,000 or \$14,000 in cancelling debts and improving our Church property. Among the most noteworthy of these improvements are \$2,000 on the Princeville charge, \$1,250 at Boyd's Grove, on the Whitefield charge, \$1,000 at Sparland, \$600 at Pekin, \$450 at Trivoli, \$420 on the Cuba charge, \$350 on the Brimfield charge and \$310 on the Henry charge.

On the demise of Thomas Allwood, one of our most substantial and excellent laymen, which occurred at Princeville during the past winter, a bequest of \$1,000 was secured to the permanent fund of the Conference Claimants' Society.

As to the benevolent collections, it greatly rejoices me to say that we have gained from ten to upwards of thirty per cent. on all of them, while it humiliates me to think that our wealthy district gives so little to these great interests. We report over \$800 gain on Missions, or thirty-three per cent. Church extension gains sixteen per cent. Freedmen's Aid fifteen per cent., while all the collections will be in advance of one year ago. It is but just that I should say that Lewistown has gained nearly or quite three hundred per cent. on Missions, Henry one hundred and fifty per cent., Lawn Ridge one hundred per cent., Pekin seventy-five per cent., Williamfield sixty-five per cent., Hale Chapel fifty per cent. and Princeville and First Church, Peoria, twenty-five per cent.

It will be seen thus that unusual pressure has not been brought to bear on one field—for all the charges, with but three to five exceptions, report gains—nor have we dwarfed the many causes that we might gain a name because of extraordinary and disproportionate effort on behalf of one cause.

The question pending at the bar of the Church, as to the admission of women as delegates to the General and Lay Electoral Conferences, was duly submitted, according to the order of the General Conference, and resulted in 771 ballots for and 227 against their admission. Only about eighteen per cent. of our membership participated in the voting.

We held two Camp Meetings—one at Wyoming during the first six days of July, and one at Oak Hill from the 11th to the 17th of August. Both meetings were seasons of great spiritual refreshing. About fifteen souls were converted at the Oak Hill meeting. Steps are being taken to greatly improve the grounds at Oak Hill, and thereby add to the permanent interest and efficiency of the meeting at that place.

We have had, as doubtless has appeared, a goodly degree of outward and material prosperity. But we have not been entirely satisfied with

such things. We thoroughly believe that all this without something higher would be but a splendid mausoleum, or a glittering pageant, hastening on the road to death. Longing to see God's power and glory as we had seen Him in the sanctuary, we traveled around the circuit lines on those prairies and patrolled the stations on the earnest hunt for souls, crying, "O Lord, revive thy work in the midst of the years; in the midst of the years make known; in wrath remember mercy," till we have seen the lighting down of the Divine arm and have heard the sound of His glorious voice in the salvation of the people. Thirty-one of the thirty-six charges report conversions and accessions to the Church. Hale Chapel, Peoria, reports 22 conversions, Wesley Church, Peoria, 25, Princeville 36, Providence 45, Bryant 46, Sparland 42, Whitefield 60 and Canton 70. The numbers reported vary from 1 to 70, aggregating upwards of 600.

Besides the illness of three of the brethren, which illness, through the good providence of God and careful treatment, ended in complete restoration to health, and the very great loss of the only son of Pastor E. S. Wilson, a young man of most excellent character, which occurred at his father's home at Canton, the 22nd of last April, after a most patient, heroic and persistent struggle for life—death nor serious sickness has entered any of our homes.

One or two of the brethren, on account of increasing years, feel compelled to discontinue the active duties of the effective relation of itinerant ministers, but the remainder continue waiting for the command of the Church through you, Bishop Joyce, and praying that through the gracious providence of Almighty God they may remain in this warfare until, in full panoply, they fall not only in sight of the holy city, but in view of the final victory of the Cross over all the earth.

STREATOR DISTRICT.

To the Bishop and Members of the Central Illinois Conference:

In presenting my second annual report of Streator District, I desire first of all to acknowledge the goodness of God in giving me strength for the work of the year. I have been able to attend all the Quarterly Conferences but two, when I was quarantined on account of scarlet fever in my family.

As soon as practicable after the close of the last session of our Conference the pastors were at their appointments ready for work and have continued until now. The general health in the homes of our pastors has been good, enabling them to do their work during the year.

Death entered but one of our parsonages. In July the sacred precincts of the family of Rev. C. W. Whorrall, our pastor at Tonia, were invaded by disease and their little son of two summers was taken. This loss was keenly felt, yet through the grace of God they were enabled to look through their falling tears, beyond the empty crib, to the home of the blest, where the good shepherd carries the lambskins in his bosom; and realize that their's was

"Safe in the arms of Jesus,
Safe on his gentle breast."

While this has been the only death in our parsonages, yet three of the homes of the supernaturated members of this body have been desolated during the year.

Early in January the beloved wife of Rev. A. C. Price was taken from his side and he was left to walk the remainder of life's rugged way alone. For many years she had shared the toil and hardships of the Itinerancy with her husband and proved a true help-meet. After a lingering illness of some months, during which she was a great sufferer, she died in holy triumph and passed to her eternal reward.

About the middle of July, the Rev. William Matheny was killed by the cars. He was returning from Bloomington, where he had been to dispose of the products of his garden, to his home in Normal, when as he was crossing the Chicago & Alton R. R., he was crushed by a passing train, his horse killed, his wagon broken and he received wounds from which he died in a few days. Bro. Matheny was an innocent, sweet-spirited, joyful Christian, and though his summons came suddenly, in a chariot of fire, it found the man of God ready and he was translated.

During the first days of August in the quietude of his home in Wenaona, the Rev. R. N. Morse passed from earth to heaven. For over forty years he had gone in and out among the brethren of this Conference. During his early manhood he was stalwart, lithe and active, and did and endured much for God and the Church in this state. He was a clear thinker and an able theologian and a strong preacher of the Armenian Methodist type. He died full of hope, trusting in the Christ whose gospel he had preached and is without doubt before the throne of God.

Early in the fall some of the pastors began revival work, and during the winter nearly every charge held special services. There were some grand meetings, those worthy of note being at Pontiac, Colfax, Minonk, Grand Ridge, Dwight, Chenoa, Washburn, Albion on the Deer Creek Circuit, and Gridley. These with revivals of lesser note, have resulted in nearly 900 conversions and demonstrated that the gospel of Jesus Christ has not lost its power nor the itinerant his zeal for God and love for souls, and that Methodist methods are effectual in bringing men to the Savior.

While the supreme purpose of our ministry is the salvation of souls and the edification of the "Body of Christ," yet we have not been neglectful of the temporalities of the Church.

Just before Christmas a beautiful church was dedicated at Washburn, costing, with the lot, \$3,000 and all paid.

At Albion on the Deer Creek circuit, as a result of a revival, a neat little chapel has been erected at a cost of about \$1,200.

At Toluca, a new town on the Santa Fe R. R., we commenced preaching in the spring. All during the summer Pastor Lowther, who had volunteered to preach for these people on Sunday afternoons, held services under the trees, as there was no hall or church in the village. The people were anxious for a church and soon a subscription paper was circulated and \$1,400 raised for a church, which is in course of erection and will be completed this fall. Besides these new churches, improvements have been made at Gridley, La Rose, Minonk, Pontiac, Roanoke, Streator and Tonia, and the debt of \$2,000 against our church at Pontiac, the subscription for which was taken last year, has been paid.

A beautiful new parsonage has been completed at El Paso worth \$2,500. A roomy and convenient parsonage has been purchased at Chenoa costing \$2,000. At Eureka a home for the pastor has been bought costing \$1,100. At Hennepin, through the efforts of the pastor, the old parsonage was sold for \$300, another location obtained and a new house erected, making a comfortable home worth \$1,000. At Magnolia a new front to the parsonage has been completed costing \$500. A debt of \$350 has been paid on the parsonage at Flanagan. These with numerous minor repairs give us 31 parsonages in the District as comfortable homes for our pastors.

The Illinois Wesleyan University, under the joint patronage of this and the Illinois Conference, being contiguous to my district, it affords me pleasure to report its prosperity.

The past year has been the best in attendance in the history of the institution. There were present during the year 720 students who paid \$10,325 for tuitions. This is 105 more students than the preceding year and 97 more than any year since 1877. The proposition of Rev. Hiram Buck, D.D., to give the Institution improved farm lands to the value of \$12,000 on condition that \$25,000 more be raised by Jan. 1, 1893, is now assured. The Hon. W. B. Harvey a member of our Church at Washington, Ill., has given \$15,000 toward the proposition of Dr. Buck on the condition that the people of Bloomington give \$10,000. This amount has nearly all been raised and a good portion of it paid. Rev. B. W. Baker, the agent appointed by this Conference, has secured in addition to the above \$5,000 in notes and pledges. Besides the above some friends of the University have promised \$10,000 each if ten can be secured that will give equal amounts. During the past year the buildings have been improved, steam heating put in and the Chapel refitted and frescoed. The chairs that were vacant in the faculty have been mostly filled and with competent professors and better appliances, we look for a good year. The commencement exercises showed that the young men and women graduating from the various departments had been in the hands of able instructors and were going out with culture and knowledge to meet the responsibilities of life. This University is worthy the sympathy, support and patronage of all our people.

The spirit of this young people's era has been caught by the Methodists of Streator District. We are convinced of the wisdom of a Methodist Young Peoples' Society for young Methodists. Hence we have pushed the organization of Epworth Leagues throughout the entire district, and as a result we report 37 Epworth and 5 Junior Leagues with a total membership of about 1900. This has been accomplished by hard work and in some instances against the prejudices of the older people of the church. But the devotion of our young people to their religious meetings and the plans adopted for bringing unconverted young people into sympathy with the church services are showing the wisdom of the organization.

According to the order of the last General Conference, the election on the proposition to admit women to the Lay Electoral and General Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church was held in all our congregations during last November. The result is as follows: Whole

number of votes cast, 1265, there being 1006 for the proposition and 259 against it, making a majority of 747 for it.

We have endeavored to carry out the injunction of the discipline regarding the benevolences of the church. Early in the fall at a meeting of the pastors, plans were adopted for taking the smaller collections during Thanksgiving and Christmas, which resulted successfully in most charges where it was thoroughly worked. We report \$4289.00 for missions, being an advance of nearly \$300.00 over last year and nearly \$500.00 above the apportionment made to this district. Proportionate advances have been made in many of the other collections.

In accomplishing the results herein set forth we acknowledge the devotion and co-operation of 37 faithful pastors who have done their best for God and the church, and the blessing of our Christ.

ROCK ISLAND DISTRICT.

Dear Bishop and Brethren of the Conference:

It is with feelings of profound gratitude to God that I submit my third annual report of the work done within the bounds of Rock Island district for the year now closing.

There are thirty-four charges in this district having a membership of about 5,000.

The brethren were early at their work, and with few exceptions, have remained at their posts until the close of the year.

Bro. Middleton, a probationer of the Conference, was compelled, on account of failing health, to resign his charge about the first of June.

The spirit of revival has pervaded the district, and wonderful awakenings have been witnessed in many places this year. Rock Island, Moline, Colona, Keithsburg, Kewanee and many other charges have witnessed wonderful outpourings of the spirit of God. About 900 conversions and 800 accessions have been reported.

During the year three new Churches have been dedicated, free from debt.

Our new and beautiful Church at Rock Island was dedicated Oct. 12th. This Church is valued at \$50,000, and is one of the most substantial and convenient Churches in Methodism. At Keithsburg and Aledo new and beautiful churches have been dedicated, costing from \$6,000 to \$7,000 each.

At Green River, a station on the C., R. I. & P. R. R., within the bounds of the Colona charge, a neat little Church, costing about \$1,000, is now being erected.

At Kewanee a splendid Parsonage has been erected at a cost of \$2,600, which, together with the lot, is valued at \$4,000.

Almost the entire district has been organized into Epworth League chapters. Large things are expected from our young people, who are becoming so thoroughly organized and equipped for service in the Church.

The pastors have been very active on lines of benevolence. Handsome advances have been made, over last year's reports, on nearly all the

charges. Notwithstanding the large expenditures made on Church building this year and the special gift of \$500 made last year by Father Tuttle to the Missionary Society, we confidently expect the district to cover the record of last year with a handsome margin. The district has swung, this year, far beyond the "million and a quarter" line.

The Woman's Foreign Missionary Society has made a splendid record. The reports will show that the district has contributed not far from \$1,300 to the W. F. M. S.

The district will contribute not less than \$5,500 to the cause of Missions this year, making an average of more than one dollar per member for the entire membership.

The vote on the admission of women to the General Conference was taken in due form as directed by the discipline. Whole number of votes cast, 1,078; for admission, 899; against admission, 179; majority for admission, 720.

Great harmony has pervaded the district during the year. The sound of discord has not been heard. The pastors have all been faithful and have co-operated heartily with the Presiding Elder in his work.

During the year death has come twice to the homes of the preachers of the district. Bro. Gimson, of Taylor Ridge charge, was called to part with his youngest daughter, Mattie, aged 16 years. Early in life she gave her heart to God. She was a most beautiful and devoted Christian girl, and died October 5th in the full assurance of a living faith in a risen and loving Savior. On the 25th day of May the death angel dropped down into our home and took away our darling daughter, Della, the youngest of our family. When but a babe we gave her to God, and for nearly eleven years her life was full of sunshine. It now seems to us that God had sent down one of His brightest angels to live with us for a little while, and that He has just called back His own. While her life was full of sunshine her death was full of holy triumph. As she drew near to the end of her earthly life, she requested us to sing, and for more than an hour she kept us singing songs of salvation. "Jesus loves me, this I know, for the Bible tells me so." "Jesus, lover of my soul, let me to thy bosom fly," and "O sing to me of Heaven when I am called to die," were some of the songs she sang with us as she lingered for a little while on the border land, just outside the gate of Heaven. "Just as I am, without one plea, but that thy blood was shed for me," was the last song she sang on earth. While singing the last stanza of this hymn, "Just as I am, thy love unknown hath broken every barrier down, now to be thine, yea, thine alone, O Lamb of God, I come, I come," she clapped her little hands and sweetly whispered: "I am going home; I will see Jesus, grandma, and, O, so many. Thus on the wings was her happy spirit wafted up to glory. No sooner had she ceased to sing with us on earth than she began to sing with the redeemed in Heaven.

While this unfolding flower of promise has faded, the perfume of this precious plant still lingers in our home. While the voice of our darling has been hushed in silence, the music of her sweet songs still echoes in our ears. While the sunshine of her life, which illumined our home for a little while, faded away, it was only to be swallowed up in

the effulgence of glory that gathered around her when God took her to Himself.

When we think of her the words of the Master are full of comfort, "Of such is the Kingdom of Heaven."

Memoirs.

WILLIAM MATHENY.

William Matheny was born in Adams County, Ohio, March 31, 1821, and died in Normal, Illinois, July 15, 1891. He was fatally injured by a train on the Chicago & Alton R. R., and was unconscious until the time of his death.

Brother Matheny was converted and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church when about twenty-one years of age, and soon after was licensed to preach.

In 1839 he removed to West Virginia, where, in 1848, he married Miss Amanda Atkinson. In 1856 he came with his family to Marietta, Ill., where, for a time, he engaged in school teaching, and afterwards removed to Prairie City, where he remained until the winter of 1859, when he was employed by the Presiding Elder to supply Cuba circuit, which he served two years. In March, 1860, he buried his wife and was left with the care of five children.

In 1864 he married Miss Martha Filer, by whom he had eight children, three of whom died in early life. In 1870 he was admitted into the Central Illinois Conference as a probationer, ordained a deacon in 1873 and an elder in 1875, and served the following charges:

Sunbeam, Illinois City, Andalusia, North Henderson, Rock River Valley, Atkinson, La Prairie Center and La Fayette.

He was returned to two of these charges for a second term, viz.: Sunbeam and Illinois City.

In 1885 he took a superannuated relation and moved to Bloomington, Ill., that his children might have the privilege of attending the Illinois Wesleyan University, and in 1889 he removed to Normal, and there finished his earthly life.

Bro. Matheny was endowed with a good intellect, and a number of his early years were devoted to school teaching in West Virginia and Illinois. It was a source of great enjoyment to him to read and study the standard authors of the Church and of literature. He was a loyal Methodist, strongly attached to the Church of his choice, and greatly admired her distinctive features. He was earnest and evangelical in his style of

preaching, and deeply spiritual in his style of life. He was a tender and loving father and a devoted husband. The principles of Christianity were deeply engraved in his life and were exhibited in his daily walk.

He greatly loved the ordinances of God's house, and was seldom absent from prayer-meeting, the class-meeting and the preaching of the word, and was a faithful and true friend of his pastor.

He took great delight in reading the Scriptures in private and in the family circle, and his soul fed on the hidden manna therein.

On his 70th birthday he wrote a paper setting forth his faith in God as his Father, and Christ as his Savior, in which he says: "This Jesus I humbly accept as my Savior, and in Him is completeness of power to save. I am trying to be loyal to all the requirements of the Kingdom of Grace, and am seeking, through the merits of the ascended Lord, to have a place in the city of the Great King. Nearly forty-nine years ago I enlisted myself as a disciple of Christ, and I feel sure that the Gospel is becoming to me much like it was to the Psalmist when he said: 'It is sweeter than honey and the honey comb.' I am sure that I render a hearty and willing homage to my Creator and God, and here and now I promise by His help to be true to Him and His cause."

His tragic and sudden death gave him no opportunity to leave any dying testimony; but he has left that which is far better—a living testimony of loving loyalty and consecrated service to God and His Church, and humble faith in Jesus Christ as his adorable Savior.

The widowed companion of his labors in the ministry and ten children are left in the shadows; but they lean on the promise that declares, "Weeping may endure for the night, but joy cometh in the morning."

The funeral services were held in the Methodist Episcopal Church in Normal, conducted by his pastor, Rev. M. V. B. White, assisted by Revs. Montgomery, Graves and Denning, and his remains were laid to rest in the Bloomington cemetery in the hope of that precious promise held out to every faithful worker in God's vineyard: "He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall, doubtless, come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him."

REV. ROSWELL NEWMAN MORSE.

Rev. Roswell Newman Morse was born in Bond County, Illinois, December 13th, 1821, and died at his home in Wenona, Illinois, August 4th, 1891.

Between these two events there was a human life full of intense eagerness to know the truth and great ardor and power in disseminating it.

He came of good parentage. His father, Samuel G. Morse, was a man of great natural ability, and had convictions and clear ideas on the great moral questions of his day. He was a member of the first Constitutional Convention of the great state of Illinois and when at that convention the fate of Illinois as a free or slave state trembled in the balance, his voice plead for freedom and finally his vote wheeled the state into line with the free states of the Union.

The son whose death we mourn, profoundly respected his father's integrity, intellect and piety, and the son formed his own life after the pattern of his honored father's life and so on the questions that agitated church and state, R. N. Morse could always be counted on the right side.

When six years of age, with his father's family, he came to Sangamon County, and eight years later to Warren County, Illinois, where he grew to manhood, amidst the toil, privations and hardships of a pioneer settlement.

About three o'clock in the morning of September, 6th 1837, at a camp meeting held near where Berwick, in Warren County, now stands, he was clearly and happily converted, and a few days afterward joined the Methodist Episcopal church.

Barton H. Cartwright, while pastor of Berwick circuit, in 1846, gave the young man license to exhort, and he was some time afterward appointed by the Presiding Elder to preach on the Knoxville circuit.

In the fall of 1847 he was received on trial in the Rock River Conference and appointed to Peoria circuit. His next appointment was Farmington circuit, and in 1849 he was sent to Hennepin circuit, where his ministry was signally blessed of God, and where he married Miss Lucinda J. Cowen, who through all his ministerial life afterward stood by his side as an efficient helper and constant inspiration in the work of soul saving.

At the revival held at Cherry Point, on the Hennepin circuit, five young men were converted who afterward became successful preachers of the word: Revs. J. G. Evans, Z. R. Jones, Creighton Springer, M. C. Springer and Lewis Springer.

In 1854 Bro. Morse was appointed Presiding Elder of Rock Island district, where for four years he was in labors abundant, and left the district with shattered health, but went from the district to Peoria Second Church charge, in the then Peoria, now Central Illinois, Conference. After serving this church he was transferred to the Rock River Conference and was stationed at Ottawa, then at Wilmington, Shannahan and Platteville. At the close of his term at Platteville he was again compelled to take a superannuated relation. After three and one-half years retirement on a farm, during which term he served Wenona circuit as a supply, he was transferred to the Central Illinois Conference and appointed to Lewistown and afterward to Brimfield, Chillicothe, then Whitefield, and was again compelled to superannuate. After taking this relation he removed to Wenona, Illinois, where he remained until his death.

During his last superannuation he often assisted in special meetings, held quarterly meetings for the Elder and filled the pulpits of brethren who were compelled to be absent for a time from their work. During this time for nearly two years he supplied the church at Varna, and during the whole period of his superannuation, was very often called upon to officiate at funerals.

He never ceased to be a preacher and at heart was always an "itinerant" preacher.

He was a great student. Few men of his day or time were better read up in the cardinal doctrines of the church, and but few men could present these doctrines with greater clearness, precision and force than he.

Nature marked him for a great man. And in spite of a lack of educational advantages, his early manhood years devoted to incessant physical toil, he was a great man. Always clear, logical and forcible as a public speaker, at times he was wonderfully eloquent.

In his last sickness he looked forward to the "time of his departure" with unspeakable pleasure. He talked of his death with the same composure as if he were starting on a journey to see a dear earthly friend. He greatly loved his family and the thought of leaving them all sometimes caused a struggle of soul.

He had not the slightest fear or dread of death. He looked with intense longing for the hour of release here and glory over yonder. He died in the triumph of the faith he has so successfully preached to others and that had sustained him so wonderfully through all his manhood life.

He has parted the curtain that hides the glory of the future from the unfavorable conditions of the present. He was always wanting to know during this earth life about the wonderful moral government of God. To him now

"Things once invisible are visible;
 Things hoped for present.
 In the sunshine of the dear Lord's smile
 He sees darkly no more.
 No longer gazing in a glass,
 But gazing face to face and eye to eye,
 He knows the beloved even as he himself is known."

MARGARET PRICE.

Margaret, the youngest child of Robert and Deborah Jameson, was born at East Liberty, Fayette County, Pennsylvania, March 7th, 1827. Ten children graced the happy home of her childhood, of which we have said she was the youngest.

Her father had been reared a strict Presbyterian. In their early married life both parents were soundly, thoroughly and happily converted to God, and their home became a model of Methodist zeal, spirituality and conservatism, together with Presbyterian integrity, faithfulness and thoroughness.

All the children excepting one, which died in infancy, grew to manhood and womanhood, and all of them, except one son, who died at the age of twenty-one years, had made a profession of religion in their early years, and this son, shortly before his death, was converted and died exclaiming,

"Jesus can make a dying bed
 Soft as downy pillows are."

Sister Price enjoyed in her early life the richest earthly blessing God can give and the most precious heritage parents can give to their children.

Her's was a godly home, where God was revered, worshipped and loved. In that home the word of God and the family altar had a prominent place, and with which nothing was suffered to interfere. God's will was earnestly, intelligently and reverently sought, and was as lovingly obeyed and accepted as their rule of life.

The parents, together with all the children, were great lovers of sacred music, and in their family worship they sang most all the hymns contained in the Methodist Hymn Book. In the family circle they were able to carry all the parts of music, and the holy hour was made melodious with songs of praise and thanksgiving to God. Thus, with the reading of His holy word and earnest prayer and spiritual song, they opened their home and their hearts, inviting the presence of Him whom they delighted to serve.

One uncle, who remained single and made his home with them, became an eminent minister in the Methodist Episcopal Church, dying an honored member of the Pittsburg Conference.

Their home was the stopping place of the Methodist preachers, and nearly all the eminent men of the Church, in that day, were entertained under their hospitable roof.

Under their hallowed influence, when in the thirteenth year of her age, Sister Price was converted and began an earnest Christian life, which ended only at her death. Thus more than fifty years of her life was spent in an active and loyal service of the Lord Jesus Christ.

The joy and warmth of the family worship in the old family home, together with the strict observance of God's law respecting the Sabbath day, was often referred to by the children in after life, and always with the greatest respect and gratitude.

June 2nd, 1852, she was married to the Rev. A. C. Price. In 1856 they came to Illinois, Bro. Price cherishing the idea and intention of becoming an intelligent farmer. But here the pressing needs of the Church and the cause of Christ were put before them in such a way by Providence that a known duty could no longer be disregarded.

A recommendation to the traveling connection of the Methodist Episcopal Church was offered them without their asking for it, and which was at first stoutly refused, but their hearts were touched by the urgent needs of the cause of Christ and the earnest solicitations of the Church, so, after husband and wife had consulted together, they determined gladly to devote their whole energy and life to the service of God in the Methodist itinerancy, so, in 1856, their itinerant life began, and only ended eleven years ago, when the failing health of the husband peremptorily demanded and required that he should take a superannuated relation.

Sister Price always entered heartily into the work of her husband, sharing the toil and hardships and rejoicing in the successes attending the life of a Methodist itinerant.

In protracted meetings and all revival services she was a most efficient helper at the altar in leading penitent inquiring souls to the Savior. She had a great love for God's house and greatly enjoyed all the "means of grace." She always attended all the services of the Church, as long as her health would permit. I have heard her speak, many times, with deep regret, during the last three years, because on account of her health she

could not attend regularly the services of the Church. This seemed a cross peculiarly hard for her to bear.

For many years Sister Price was an earnest and efficient worker in the Sunday School. She was always deeply interested in each member of her class; and after she was no longer able to serve the Master in the active work of the Sunday School, she sometimes delighted to recall her classes, mentioning each of her scholars by name.

Sister Price loved the Bible with an intense love. She read and studied it daily and systematically. She had read the Bible through by course many times, and especially did she love to walk with the Lord Jesus through the Gospel and breathe out her soul's prayer and praise through the Psalms. The last day she was able to sit in a chair she called for the Bible, and, after reading a while, she being very weak, handed it back, saying she could not hold it longer to read.

She was not demonstrative in her temperament, but rather by nature she was possessed of a quiet, steady and serene spirit. Her religious experience was clear and decisive. All the truths of our holy religion she grasped and held with a steady and unwavering faith. She was not emotional, like the noisy brooklet rippling over its shallow, pebbly bed, but rather her every-day experience was like the deep, steady current of a mighty river. She drank daily and deeply at the fountain of God's word, and rested serenely on His promise, realizing that the everlasting arms were beneath her continually.

Sister Price was a great sufferer during the last few years of her life, but she bore it all with unusual fortitude and a calm, Christian resignation. During her last illness her suffering was intense and long continued, but never a murmur passed the threshold of her lips.

Now, with these facts of her life and Christian character before us, can any one be surprised that her departure was so peaceful and triumphant?

From the first of her long illness she seemed to realize that it was her last, and that the end of her earthly pilgrimage was drawing near. She spoke of death without fear and her departure from this world with the calmness and assurance of one going on a journey to visit loving friends. She realized the full depths of meaning in the Apostle's words:

"For me to live is Christ, to die is gain."

"To depart and be with Christ is far better."

For weeks before her release came she was able to sleep or rest but little, day or night, and when asked how she felt she would say, "I am weary, so tired," and after would add, "There is sweet rest in Heaven."

The night before she passed from this mortal to the immortal life, while her husband was trying to place her in a comfortable and restful position, she exclaimed:

"O where shall rest be found,

Rest for the weary soul!"

And then he added the remaining two lines of the stanza:

"'Twere vain the ocean's depth to sound

Or pierce to either pole,"

When she exclaimed, "But there's sweet rest in Heaven."

He then asked her: "Maggie, is your soul weary?" "No, no," she said, "but my poor body."

Then he repeated another stanza:

"Beyond this vale of tears
There is a life above,
Unmeasured by the flight of years,
And all that life is love!"

To which she replied, "Yes, yes, O blessed hope! There is sweet rest in Heaven!"

As I stood by her dying bed I thought, O that all the world might see how a Christian can die! and also see how the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ and the immortal hope of the Gospel, and the presence and comfort of the Holy Spirit, can sustain God's children when passing through the severest trial this mortal life can know—the parting from our loved ones, when the death dew gathers upon the brow and the lips answer not the voice of love, and the eye recognizes not nor answers back the emotion of the soul too deep for utterance.

Wednesday she failed very fast, and at 7:30 in the evening she sank into a restful and peaceful sleep.

At ten o'clock Wednesday evening, Jan. 7th, 1891, she was not, for God had taken her, and she had entered into the blessed haven of God's infinite and eternal rest.

She was the seventh of her family to enter into the Heavenly inheritance.

Her age was sixty-three years and ten months. She has left a husband and her only child, a daughter, to mourn the irreparable loss of a faithful wife and a loving mother, and a large circle of friends will miss her and mourn her departure.

But, blessed be God, "We do not sorrow to-day like those who have no hope." We trust in a risen Christ and hope in the resurrection of the just. We rejoice to-day because the great source of comfort and consolation is known by those who sorrow to-day, and in Him they find comfort and hope.

D. H. Kreidler was born in St. Thomas, Franklin county, Pa., Dec. 6th, 1835, and passed from his earthly sufferings to his reward on high in the 55th year of his age, at Pontiac, Ill.

He was converted at 12 years of age. His father dying shortly after his conversion, his early life was one of hardship and struggle. He taught school and worked on the farm to support his widowed mother. He finally succeeded in reaching the goal of his young ambition—entrance into Dickinson College.

Soon after leaving Dickinson he came to Illinois and entered the Central Illinois Conference. He was ordained elder in 1867 by Bishop E. R. Ames. He served among other charges, Lewistown Circuit, Farmington, Gardner, Braidwood, Rooks Creek, Seneca, New Michigan, and Saunemin. He located in 1873 and went to Crete, Nebraska, and entered the mercantile business. The year following he supplied

the pulpit of the M. E. Church in Crete. After two years residence in Crete, he moved to Friend, Neb., continuing in the mercantile business and actively engaged in the Master's work, was superintendent of Sabbath school and was a constant inspiration to the work of God. Upon his return from the Conference at Lincoln, Neb, where he was sent as a Lay delegate, in 1883, he was stricken with appoplexy and partial paralysis. In the spring of 1884 he moved to Pontiac, Ill., where he died Feb. 3d, 1890.

In 1865 he was married to Miss Mairian M. Shade, who died in August of 1869. In September of the following year he was married to Miss Emma M. Wickery, who, with a patience and love rarely equalled, cared for him during his long and almost helpless sickness.

He was a faithful, honest, loyal Methodist preacher, and his daily life was a faithful commentary upon the religion he professed to have found and so confidently recommended to others.

Just before his death he wrote his brother urging him to faithfulness in God's service, saying, "I well remember when father died. Just before dying he laid his hand upon my head and said, 'My son, be faithful.' Although I have passed through many things to try my faith, it has never wavered."

He was so long identified with the Central Illinois Conference it is fitting that this memoir should appear in the Minutes.

A radiant and faithful soldier of Christ has ceased his warfare and gone to enjoy the rest and peace of heaven.

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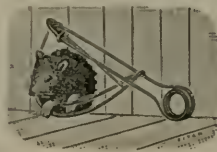

According to orders no cents appear in these columns; hence some charges will be reported fractions of dollars less than they paid. But, when the Secretary was able, he added these fractions together, and gave credit for a dollar. For example, where report said \$50.30 for missions from Churches, and \$10.70 from Sunday School, the Church will be credited with \$51.00, or the Sunday School with \$11.00, so that the total will balance. So where report reads \$5.50, and Tracts \$2.50, it will frequently appear that one of these is reported \$3.00 and the other \$2.00, so that the charge would have all the credit possible.

EDUCATION.

The Committee on Education respectfully reports as follows:

GRAND PRAIRIE SEMINARY.

We note with pleasure that the Conference Seminary has made marked progress during the year. The number of students was larger than ever. Many improvements proposed a year ago have been made. The proposed new building for chapel and conservatory is about ready for occupancy. This building is a two-story structure of brick and stone. It is 49 by 78 feet in size; containing eight music rooms, art rooms, a Society Hall and a large auditorium. This chapel, with elevated floor, large gallery, spacious platform, and 700 assembly chairs and three broad exits, is one of the best assembly rooms within the bounds of the Conference. The woodwork of the whole building is of the best quality of Southern pine, presenting a most beautiful appearance. This building is to be heated with steam. The other buildings are so heated. Important improvements have also been made at the Dormitory, in placing verandas over both entrances.

By excellent care for the trees, lawn, walks and buildings, the campus presents a very attractive appearance.

This school now has nine teachers; five of these in classics, sciences and normal; two in music; one in commercial, and one in art.

The income from tuition was nearly \$7,000. Current expenses are regularly met, and teachers are paid in full. The remaining indebtedness on buildings and improvements must be met by special gifts.

The standing of our Conference Seminary among the fifty-four Seminaries of Methodism will appear in the following comparison:

Grand Prairie Seminary ranks FOURTH in attendance among all our schools of like grade.

It ranks FIRST in attendance among all our schools of the same grade in the North having no more property.

This high rank is strengthened by the fact that of the 316 students last year only ten were younger than fifteen years; the average age being 18 years and 4 months. The natural inference from these facts is that our Seminary has a large patronage, for which the Conference and friends of Christian education should make ample provision. We can hold and increase these numbers only by bringing up our equipment to this high demand.

We recommend the following:

- 1st. That we express our sense of the great importance and usefulness of Seminaries in our Methodist system of schools.
- 2d. We approve the careful and progressive management of our Conference Seminary, and the course of the Trustees in the erection of the Chapel building.
- 3d. We earnestly favor the creation of an ample endowment for the Seminary. This Conference school should speedily secure \$50,000 additional endowment, and we will encourage every advance wisely taken.
- 4th. We recommend the appointment of Rev. S. Van Pelt, President; Rev. C. E. Pickett, Professor; Rev. W. R. Wiley, Field Secre-

tary for the Seminary; and T. W. McVety, J. H. Scott, R. B. Williams, J. E. Mercer, E. G. Cattermole and D. S. McCown, Conference Visitors.

HEDDING COLLEGE.

The past year of this worthy institution was one of increased prosperity. The enrollment was 217 against 187 the previous year, and 106 three years ago. The fall term of the present year opened with an enrollment of 140, being an increase of 15 over last year. Three years ago there were 14 undergraduates, now there are 56. Since last April \$33,500 have been raised on a \$50,000 proposition for an endowment fund. The will of B. C. Sargent makes provision for a \$50,000 Memorial Science Hall. Marked improvements have been made in buildings and equipments. The government and religious tone of the school are good. Over 85 per cent. of the students are Christians. The vacancy occasioned by the death of Dr. Jaques was filled by Rev. V. C. Randolph. His success shows the wisdom of the choice. Hedding College under the vigorous and successful administration of Dr. J. G. Evans calls forth our most hearty endorsement, and we recommend a ready co-operation with Dr. Evans in his efforts to put Hedding College, so essential to the interests of Methodism in Western Illinois, on a better financial basis. The \$50,000 proposition ought to be immediately completed. We rejoice in the increased prosperity of the College, and in the excellent prospect for the future.

ILLINOIS WESLEYAN UNIVERSITY.

The Illinois Wesleyan University not only shows greatly increased prosperity in the time covering the past school year and the beginning of the present, but has reached a crisis of opportunity. No time in its past history has presented such opportunities of enlarging its endowment fund, increasing its facilities, and thus immediately enlarging its sphere of general usefulness, as is now presented it. The preparatory school is full. The College of Letters is rapidly growing. At the last Commencement 43 passed from the preparatory school to the Freshman class. All the other schools, viz., Law, Art, and Music, are full, self-supporting, and increasing in popularity and power.

The financial agent, Rev. B. W. Baker, and the President, Dr. W. H. Wilder, are making heroic efforts to secure the \$30,000 by January, '93, necessary to bind Dr. Buck's second gift of \$15,000. They will ask the Illinois Conference at its coming session to enter at once upon the work of raising \$30,000 to be known as the Illinois Conference professorship fund, and now, through this committee, petition the Central Illinois

Conference to take like action. When we consider the excellent situation, the splendid buildings, the number of men and women—many of them eminent—who have gone out from this institution, 1,360 students now receiving most efficient instruction at her hands, the capable faculty, and the wealth of the patronizing territory, we most gladly recommend this institution to the favorable consideration of this Conference.

A most excellent selection was made when President Lackland of Chaddock College was called to the chair of Mathematics, made vacant by the resignation of Professor B. S. Potter.

We recommend the following for Trustees: William McDowel Dever, Geo. R. Palmer, H. D. Clark, James A. Bunn; also recommend the appointment of the following as Conference visitors: T. Doney, J. W. Frizzelle, R. Crewes, T. W. McVety, A. M. Conard, R. B. Williams, C. W. Ayling; also recommend the appointment of B. W. Baker as Financial Agent.

NORTHWESTERN UNIVERSITY.

This great institution of learning has enjoyed a year of prosperity in all of its varied departments. With its two million dollars' worth of property, and more than twenty-three hundred students for the last year, with prospects of a large increase during the present year, it presents a record on which Methodism may well be congratulated. The future of the University is bright with promise of a marvelous prosperity and corresponding usefulness. We recommend Rev. F. W. Merrell for Trustee instead of W. W. Carr.

GARRETT BIBLICAL INSTITUTE.

The past year has been marked by the continued blessing of God, and by progress and prosperity. Students enrolled, 185, of which number 37 graduated last May. This past year has been noted for faithful attendance, devotion to study, and increase in missionary zeal and interest.

The new members of the Faculty, Professors Little and Horsewell, have more than met the expectations of the authorities of the Institute. Improvements have been made in Library and buildings. Among gifts to the Institute may be mentioned a Scholarship from Wm. Deering, Esq., President of the Board of Trustees, and a Missionary Scholarship from Dr. Oakshet, of Dwight, Ill.

We recommend the following as Conference visitors: F. H. Cumming and W. J. Minium.

SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY, DE PAUW UNIVERSITY.

Rejoicing in the increased prosperity of this School, its efficient management, the marked success of its graduates, we heartily commend it to our young men who are desirous of a thorough and efficient theological training.

We recommend as Conference visitors, M. V. Crumbaker and E. G. Cattermole.

THE AMERICAN UNIVERSITY.

WHEREAS, The Government of the United States has passed a bill opening all collections at Washington, D. C., to the students of higher learning, amounting to \$32,000,000, supplemented by an annual expenditure of \$3,500,000, free of charge, and,

WHEREAS, The Roman Catholic Church has availed itself of this marvelous opportunity by establishing at Washington a great University; and,

WHEREAS, Through the direct effort of Bishop Hurst, seconded by the entire Board of Bishops and sustained by the action of the General Conference at Omaha, The American University has been inaugurated, and,

WHEREAS, The General Conference has set apart the 16th day of October, 1892, as the time for presenting the cause of The American University, and taking a subscription for the same as a Columbian thank-offering, therefore

Resolved, That we heartily co-operate in the action of the General Conference in the establishment of a great Christian University at Washington, D. C., and that we will try and secure a Fellowship in The American University, amounting to \$10,000 for each of our collegiate institutions—the Illinois Wesleyan University and Hedding College.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Resolved, That the collections taken by the pastors for the cause of education during the ensuing year, as required by the Discipline, shall be divided among the three institutions patronized by this Conference, upon the basis of the number of licentiates from within the bounds of the Central Illinois Conference, enrolled as literary students in the several institutions during the present academic year, said number to be certified by the presidents of the institutions.

Resolved, 5. We heartily endorse the election of our Brother R. Crewes as President of the Eighth General Conference District

Resolved, 6. That we rejoice in the prospect of the increased prosperity through the organization of the Conference League, and pledge ourselves to assist in every way possible the President, Dr. VanPelt, and his corps of assistants, in the prosecution of League work.

FREEDMEN'S AID AND SOUTHERN EDUCATION SOCIETY.

With profound gratitude to God, and feelings of Christian pride, we point to the last quadrennial report of our Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society, because it shows such remarkable development and success of the plans and efforts of the society management.

The increased receipts of the society by quadrenniums has been a wonderful endorsement by the whole church. The receipts, during the quadrennium just closed, were \$981,197.18, being an advance over any preceeding four years of \$357,196.92. This increase, however, is from all sources, including bequests, donations, etc., as well as Conference collections.

The past year has also been the most successful of all the years of the life of the society.

The society has under its directions forty-five institutions of learning, thirteen of which are of collegiate grade, in which are various departments. Gammon Theological Seminary at Atlanta, Ga., is thoroughly equipped. There were in attendance in all the schools last year 9,065 students. Of this number 166 were in the regular college classes, 1,104 in the college preparatory, 523 were especially preparing as teachers, 277 were preparing for the Ministry, and 273 were in the Medical College. During the year there were 395 conversions in the schools. 2,903 were in the music classes. A great advance has been made in the development of Manual Training and Trade schools. In these were 1,829 students. Hundreds have gone forth, not only equipped with a fair education, but with sufficient knowledge of a trade to earn from \$1.50 to \$4.00 a day. The South is the industrial home of the Negro. In our schools of Domestic Economy young ladies are prepared for the active duties of life. Our teaching force last year numbered 548. Of these, 395 were among the colored people and 153 among the white.

The work of this society is among both colored and white people, as expressed in General Conference.

"The work of the Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society shall be the establishment and maintenance of institutions of Christian learning in the Southern States among both white and colored people."

Whatever separation there is as to race is based upon the mutual preferences of the people themselves, but the schools are practically separate among white and colored people.

The Methodist Episcopal Church has in the sixteen Southern States 269,373 white and 234,036 colored members. In the same territory are 1,672,946 white and 3,042,435 colored people who cannot write. Outside of three or four of the border States the only hope of our people in the South, most of whom are poor, for Christian education and leadership, is in the schools of this Society.

There are no less than 500,000 Afro-American legalized voters who cannot read the ballot this Government has put into their hands, which fact puts them at the mercy of, and in subjection to the schemes of wicked and designing men who have no care for the safety of this Christian Government.

WHEREAS, We believe the only solution of the race problem in the Southern States, or anywhere else, in fact, is found in the permanency and progress of Christian education, inspired by our holy religion and sustained by the consecrated money of God's chosen people; and

WHEREAS, We believe the Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society of our church holds a place of great responsibility and power, equal to any other institution in this Christian land, especially in view of the fact that its work embraces the maintenance of Christian schools among both colored and white people of the South; and

WHEREAS, We find reasons for feelings of regret and sorrow, as well as rejoicing, in the reports above referred to, when we measure the meagerness of the Conference collections as compared with the urgent needs of the society for the further prosecution of its noble work; and

WHEREAS, We regret to see that so large a number of the charges in our own Conference report such small collections as indicate a failure to meet their full apportionment; therefore,

Resolved, That we recommend that our Presiding Elders apportion the full amount asked of our Conference (\$4,068) to the various Districts and charges, and urge upon our Pastors the great importance of making an earnest appeal to our people to raise the full amount asked for by this society; and, as a helpful means to this end, we recommend that our Pastors send for samples, and as far as possible use the "Southern Education Day Services" on or near the date designated by the society.

Resolved, That we recommend the "Christian Educator," published quarterly by this society at the low price of 50 cents a year, or \$1 for four years, and we would urge its general circulation among our people.

Resolved, That we approve and endorse the able and wise management of this society during the past quadrennium under the direction of J. C. Hartzell, D. D., and look for still grander results during the quadrennium just opening with Doctors Hartzell and Hamilton as Secretaries.

We would close this report in the earnest language and fervent spirit of these faithful servants of the church, as addressed to this committee.

"We plead earnestly for the co-operation and help of all lovers of humanity in the prosecution of this great educational movement."

Resolved, That we are highly pleased with the action of the President and Congress of the United States in conditioning appropriation on the closing the gates of the Columbian Exposition on Sunday during the World's Fair next year, and in view of the fact that petitions are being circulated throughout the country asking Congress to reconsider its action and open the gates on Sunday, we earnestly urge it upon every pastor to circulate a petition praying Congress to stand by the noble action already taken.

Resolved, That we heartily endorse the work of the American Sabbath Union.

STATE OF THE CHURCH.

It is with profound gratitude to God that we note the material and spiritual prosperity of the church within our bounds during the past year.

The heavy and protracted rains of the winter and spring, not only interfered with the revival meetings and the regular services of the church, but rendered the financial operations of our people very difficult.

We believe, however, that in the face of these adverse circumstances much real progress has been made, and we doubt if our work ever presented a more favorable outlook.

While in all the departments of work which we have formerly employed for the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom substantial advances have been made, we rejoice to hail in the Epworth League as a new arm of strength to uplift the world. The Epworth and Junior Leagues have been multiplied and strengthened during the past year, and fully justify the high hopes entertained concerning them.

It seems that a new era has dawned upon the church in the awakening of the slumbering energies of the young people, and the enlistment of a new wing of the army for the conquest of Satan's kingdom.

Conversions have been numerous in all of the districts and in most of the charges. The Sunday Schools, as heretofore, are doing much in the way of instructing the children in doctrine and morals, thus preparing the young minds for the reception of the Gospel seed.

That so large a number of the Sunday School scholars have been brought to Christ is a source of great comfort to parents and pastors, and a powerful incentive to the teachers and workers to press the work forward with the utmost vigor.

Camp meetings have been held in all the districts with encouraging results, both as respects the work of grace in the hearts of believers and in the conversion of sinners. We are compelled, however, to acknowledge that the church does not measure up to her high opportunities, in these meetings, for the saving of the lost. Our people often fail to lead their children and friends to the camp meeting for the express purpose of then and there securing their salvation.

The diligence of our people in building and improving churches and parsonages has not abated, showing that they are alive to the importance of providing commodious churches and suitable homes for the preachers. It is due to remark, however, that in many charges there is pressing need to take speedy steps along this line of work.

We are glad to find that the foundations of Methodism are being strengthened in the enlargement of the endowments of our schools, and the increased facilities for successful work therein. We note, also, that our Methodist patronage is waking up to the claims of these institutions for material help, as well as to the moral rights of the children to opportunities for the higher education, and that, too, in our own schools, where the safeguards of spiritual help, combined with proper intellectual training, shall give assurance of a well developed manhood.

It is also a source of profound gratitude, to know that the revival spirit is almost continuous in these schools, and often, almost all the unconverted students entering at the beginning of a term, are converted before its close. Thus the seal of God's approval is placed upon our literary institutions.

The use of Evangelists has doubtless often been very helpful in conducting revival work; yet we are glad to believe there is a growing purpose on the part of the church to utilize to the utmost the home forces. For preachers and members to receive the baptism of the Holy Ghost, as

a preparation for the work of saving souls, is, beyond all question, the divine plan.

With all the organized agencies of the church in active and successful operation, there is no visible reason why the incoming year should not be crowned with the most glorious revivals, and the most substantial achievements for God and the world that have ever marked our history.

WHEREAS, A special contribution of \$5,000 has been made for the purchase of a printing press to assist Bishop Thoburn in his mission work, and,

WHEREAS, We are asked to raise in this Conference the sum of \$850; therefore be it

Resolved, That we urge upon the preachers to see that their full apportionment to the Tract Cause is raised.

TEMPERANCE AND CONSTITUTIONAL PROHIBITION.

Your Committee on Temperance and the Prohibition of the Liquor Traffic report the following for adoption:

Resolved, That we endorse the action of the last General Conference on the subject of Temperance and the prohibition of the liquor traffic as follows:

1. PROGRESS AND DUTY.

We are profoundly grateful to God for the progress already made in every phase of the Temperance reform, and hold it to be the privilege and duty of the Methodist Episcopal Church, both to save the fallen and to wage an increasingly aggressive warfare against the liquor traffic.

2. PERSONAL ABSTINENCE.

The word of God, the teachings of science and the lessons of experience, all combine in declaring total abstinence from intoxicating beverages to be the duty of every individual.

3. OTHER ORGANIZATIONS.

We are in sympathy with and bid a hearty godspeed to all organizations, of every name and nature, that seek to promote the cause of total abstinence and accomplish the overthrow of the liquor traffic.

4. ATTITUDE TOWARDS THE TRAFFIC.

We reiterate the language of the Episcopal Address of 1888: "The liquor traffic is so pernicious in all its bearings, so inimical to the interests of honest trade, so repugnant to the moral sense, so injurious to the peace and order of society, so hurtful to the home, to the church and to the body politic, and so utterly antagonistic to all that is precious in life, that the only proper attitude towards it for Christians is that of relentless hostility. It can never be legalized without sin."

We concur with the Episcopal Address of 1892, where it is declared: "In our judgment the saloon is an unmixed evil, full of diabolism, a disgrace to our civilization, the chief corrupter of political action, and a continual menace to the order of society and the peace and purity of our homes."

Believing, as we do, that the traffic in intoxicating beverages sustains the relation of an efficient cause to the vice of intemperance, we hold that no member of the Methodist Episcopal Church can consistently contribute by voice, vote or influence to the perpetuation and protection of that traffic.

We declare before all the world that the Church of God ought to be known always and everywhere as the relentless and uncompromising foe of this ungodly business, and that it is the duty of every Christian to wage ceaseless warfare against it.

5. ATTITUDE TOWARD THE TRAFFICKER AND HIS SUPPORTERS.

We emphatically declare that men engaged in the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages ought not to receive the commercial patronage of Christian people, nor should those who either directly or indirectly sustain the liquor traffic receive the suffrages of Christian men.

6. THE LICENSE SYSTEM.

License laws are the liquor traffic's strongest bulwark of defense. They are wrong in principle and impotent for good. We are unalterably opposed to the enactment of laws that propose, by license, taxing or otherwise, to regulate the drink traffic, because they provide for its continuance and afford no protection against its ravages.

We will accept no compromise, but demand the unconditional surrender of the rebellious business.

7. GOVERNMENT AND THE TRAFFIC.

We rejoice in the clear announcement of the Supreme Court of the United States touching the saloon question, as follows: "The State cannot by any contract limit the exercise of her power to the prejudice of the public health and the public morals." "No legislation can bargain away the public health or the public morals. The public themselves cannot do this, much less their servants. Government is organized with a view to their preservation, and cannot divest itself of the power to provide for them." "There is no inherent right in a citizen to thus sell intoxicating

liquors by retail; it is not a privilege of a citizen of the State, or a citizen of the United States." "The statistics of every State show a greater amount of crime and misery attributable to the use of ardent spirits obtained at these liquor saloons than to any other cause." "By the general concurrence of opinion of every civilized and Christian community there are few sources of crime and misery in society equal to the dramshop, where intoxicating liquors in small quantities, to be drunk at the time, are sold indiscriminately to all parties applying." "The great principle of the common law, which is equally the teaching of Christian morality, is so to use one's property as not to injure others."

Commending the United States Senate for its action in the premises, we condemn the Lower House of our national Congress for its repeated refusal to pass the bills providing for the appointment of a national commission of inquiry to investigate and report upon the influence of the liquor traffic upon the material and moral welfare of the country.

We insist that the United States Government, and the various State Governments, in tolerating the liquor traffic for a money consideration, are guilty of wicked complicity with a business whose awful work of destruction brands it as alike an enemy to God and man.

We desire especially to place ourselves on record as repudiating to the utmost of our ability the action of the General Government, through the department of State, in prostituting its powers, at the request of American brewers and maltsters to collect information, and to use the machinery of the Government to promote the sale of liquors in South American countries.

S. POLITICAL ACTION.

We recommend all members of the Methodist Episcopal Church who enjoy the elective franchise to so use that solemn trust as to promote the rescue of our country from the guilt and dishonor which have been brought upon it by criminal complicity with the liquor traffic.

We do not presume to dictate the political conduct of our people, but we do record our deliberate judgment that no political party has a right to expect, nor ought it to receive the support of Christian men, so long as it stands committed to the license policy or refuses to put itself on record in an attitude of open hostility to the saloon.

Resolved, That this report shall not be construed as an endorsement of any political party.

Resolved, That we endorse the plan adopted by the General Conference Committee of fifteen, proposing, wherever practicable, the organization of Christian Temperance Leagues, for the purpose of distributing temperance literature and agitating, from a Christian standpoint, the question of the suppression of the liquor traffic; and we recommend that the Central Illinois Conference Temperance Society co-operate with the General Conference Committee in the prosecution of this work.

USE OF TOBACCO.

WHEREAS, The use of tobacco is a national evil of gigantic proportion, injuring health, wasting wealth, and debauching conscience to an extent second only to the ruin and devastation wrought by rum; being a

fruitful cause of paralysis and insanity, clouding the intellect, and benumbing the conscience, and weakening the will; and recognizing that it is especially with the young, in the form of the deadly cigarette, a rapidly growing evil, so that the sales in this form have increased from nothing to many millions annually; and,

WHEREAS, The permitted use of this deadly narcotic is now the greatest evil tolerated in the church, therefore

Memoirs.

DR. JABEZ ROBERT JAQUES.

Dr. Jabez Robert Jaques was born at Stowerton, in the parish of Wichford, in the county of Warwick, England, on the 8th day of December, 1828, and died in Abingdon, Ill., March 22, 1892. These two dates mark the material limits of a remarkably beautiful and successful life. His parents were earnest Christians, and over the record of his baptism, which rite was administered by Rev. John Wood, on March 29th, 1829, Dr. Jaques has preserved two Quarterly tickets, the one given to his father and the other to his mother, and each bearing the date 1826. "I wait for the Lord, my soul doth wait, and in his word do I hope," is the Scripture upon his father's ticket, and upon his mother's, "As new-born babes desire the sincere milk of the word that ye may grow thereby." Perfectly natural for parents thus so devoted to the word to consecrate their child to God in baptism, and these early conditions were certainly no misfortune to the boy. Dr. Jaques was licensed to preach in 1850, having been converted a short time previously at a quiet evening meeting. The testimonials to his moral character and scholarship while in college are numerous and creditable.

Entering Genesee College (now Syracuse University) in 1850, he was graduated at the head of his class as valedictorian in 1854, and was immediately called to the work of a Christian educator, acting as Principal of Conference Seminaries from 1854 till 1857. When liberated for a time from educational work by the burning of Mansfield Classical Seminary, of which he was Principal, he took work for five years in the pastorate of important charges in the East Genesee Conference, his last charge being the First Methodist Episcopal Church of Rochester, N. Y.

On account of temporary bronchial trouble he returned to the classroom work in 1862, and was Professor of Ancient Languages in the Collegiate Institute of Rochester, N. Y., for three years, when he was called to be Professor of Ancient Languages and German in the Illinois Wesleyan University, where he remained ten years.

On account of his attainments in Philology, he was, in 1869, elected member of the American Philological Association, which is one of the highest honors which can be conferred on a classical professor in the United States. In 1875 he submitted to a rigorous written examination in Comparative Philology at Syracuse University, N. Y., and thus won the degree of Doctor of Philosophy, which was conferred in June, 1875.

On the same day, by a singular coincidence, the honorary degree of D. D. was conferred on him by the Indiana Asbury University (now De Pauw University). In September, 1875, Dr. Jaques was elected President of Albert College and University, Belleville, Canada, and also Professor of Ancient Languages. After the union of all the Methodist bodies of Canada and the consequent transfer of the Albert University graduates and under-graduates to Victoria University, in 1885, he resigned as president and professor and spent some time in the pastorate, serving as temporary pastor of Central Methodist Episcopal Church of New York city—the one in which Dr. J. P. Newman preached and General Grant worshipped. A brief respite from college work was followed by an election to the Presidency of Hedding College, Abingdon, Illinois, which he accepted, and upon the same day an election to the chair of Greek in McKendree College, which position he, of course, had to resign. These elections occurred in June, 1886. An election, in 1890, to membership in the American Academy of Political and Social Science was followed, in 1891, by an election to membership in the American Institute of Christian Philosophy. Dr. Jaques was not without honors, but his merit far transcended his reward. But when, on March 22, from the Great Teacher he received his diploma, bearing the inscription, "Well done good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord," all deficiencies of earthly compensation were cancelled and his merit by honors more than matched.

• His life was a constant inspiration, his spirit a perpetual rebuke, his achievements an abiding incentive, his counsel a coveted comfort and guide.

The funeral services were held in Hedding College chapel, March 23d, 1892. The singing was conducted by Prof. Bertha V. Drayer. Rev. G. J. Luckey offered prayer. A memoir was read by Rev. R. Crewes, and brief addresses were made by Dr. J. S. Cumming, P. E.; Dr. J. B. McMichael, President of Monmouth College; Prof. Lee, of Lombard University, and Dr. J. G. Evans, President of Hedding College. On the 24th a memorial service was held in Amy Chapel, Illinois Wesleyan University, Bloomington, Illinois, at which addresses were made by Dr. Evans, Prof. B. S. Potter and Dr. W. H. Wilder, President of the University. The body was laid away to sleep in the Bloomington cemetery until the resurrection morn.

REV. JAMES TUBBS.

Rev. James Tubbs was born at Clifton Park, N. Y., April 20, 1817. At 17 years of age he was converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, and while still quite young was licensed as a local preacher. He entered the Troy Conference as a probationer in June, 1850. He received ordination at the hands of Bishop Jaues, being ordained Deacon at Plattsburg in June, 1852, and Elder at the city of Albany in May, 1854; the same Bishop presiding.

In 1863 he was transferred to the Central Illinois Conference, and appointed to Kirkwood, then known as Young America.

Bro. Tubbs was the father of Methodism in Kirkwood. His work here began in 1858, and his interest never flagged. He preached the

first sermon, by a Methodist preacher, in this village, and organized the class. He was pastor of the church here three years, 1863-1866, during which time he built the church, cleared it of debt, and left the society in a prosperous condition.

Perhaps his most efficient work was done in the city of Philadelphia, between the years 1876 and 1887, while sustaining a superannuated relation to our Conference. Here he preached and labored in the mission churches, the jails, the penitentiary and the various charitable institutions of the city and vicinity; working independently, and receiving no other pay than the consciousness of doing good, and no record has been kept save that which is written in the book that shall be opened in the Great Day.

Bro. Tubbs was a man of strong character and fine personal appearance, always commanding respect and attention. In manner he was self-possessed and courteous, maintaining a dignity of bearing and propriety of dress and language that marked him as a Christian gentleman. His talents were of a high order, and his literary attainments extensive. He was a student both of books and of men, and a keen observer of the signs of the times. His preaching was largely didactic, always forcible and sometimes eloquent and powerful. He was a true friend, tender and sympathetic. With abilities that might have made him the possessor of a fortune, his life and his income were largely devoted to the service of Christ and of suffering humanity.

He was twice married. First, to Miss Betsy Ferguson in 1837. She died in 1847. He was afterward united in marriage to Miss Mary A. Barton, at Amsterdam, N. Y. She also passed to her reward Jan. 9, 1888. He never ceased to mourn her loss, till the thin veil that separated them was rent aside by the hand of the death angel, and he was permitted to join her in the better land. He died at the home of his son Henry, in Chicago, on Saturday, June 25, 1892. His memory will be revered by those who knew him as a man of God. His body was brought home for burial, and rests beside the body of his beloved wife in Centre Grove cemetery. The funeral services were conducted by his pastor, Rev. Robert Barton. The sermon was from Isaiah xxxiii, 17: "Thine eyes shall see the King in his beauty; they shall behold the land that is very far off."

REV. JOHN HENCH McMEEN.

Rev. John Hench McMeen was born in Port Royal, Pa., March 5th, 1858, and was drowned at Peoria, Ill., July 14, 1892, in the wreck of the Frankie Folsom. Brother McMeen was of Scotch descent, his parents were Presbyterians, he being the only Methodist in his family. He was converted through the influence of Rev. Baldwin in the year 1878.

In 1879 he came to Farmington, Ill., and united with the M. E. Church where he at once began to prepare himself for the work of the Christian Ministry. In the year 1886 he was admitted on trial in the Central Illinois Conference and ordained Deacon in 1888, and had he remained with us he doubtless would have been ordained Elder at its present session.

During his brief Ministerial life Brother McMeen rendered efficient services at the following charges: 1886, Ninth street, Rock Island; 1887 to 1889, Munster; 1889, La Rose; 1890 to 1892, Roanoke and Benson.

After his body was recovered from the wreck it was kindly cared for by the Secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association, of Peoria, Ill., assisted by the Pastors of the M. E. Churches of the city. Memorial services were held on his charge at Benson, Ill., Monday, July 18. Rev. Thomas Doney, his Presiding Elder, preached an effective memorial discourse to a large congregation of sympathizing friends and parishioners. During the services all the business houses of the city were closed and twelve of the Pastors of the District were present to show their respect for the deceased and to assist in the services. The remains were conveyed to Port Royal, Pa. The funeral services were held July 17, at 2:30 P. M., at the M. E. Church. Five Ministers were present during the services, seventy-one carriages followed the remains to Church Hill cemetery where he was laid to rest within a few rods of the place where he was born.

Hundreds were at the cemetery to pay their last tribute of respect to their departed friend. Brother McMeen was a young man of purity of purpose, his life was truly consecrated to the work of the Christian Ministry and the revival service which he conducted last winter at Benson was honored of God in the conversion of twenty-five souls. He was beloved by all and his memory will always be cherished with warmest affection by those who knew him best.

Rest from thy labor, rest,
Soul of the just set free!
Blest be thy memory, and blest
Thy bright example be!

Servant of God, well done!
Thy glorious warfare's past;
The battle's fought, the race is won.
And thou art crowned at last.

REV. CHARLES FRANKLIN MIDDLETON.

Rev. Charles Franklin Middleton was born near Princeton, Ill., August 16, 1866, and died in his home in Dover, Ill., February 4, 1892. He had therefore reached the age of 25 years, 5 months and 18 days. His childhood and early youth were spent on his father's farm in Arispie, Bureau County, Ill., and were unmarked by particular events, while struggling up the incline toward manhood. Feeling the need of a higher education he entered Dover Seminary in Bureau County and in the spring of 1886 graduated, at only 18 years of age.

Here at school he was converted while attending a union revival service conducted in the Congregational Church, and upon giving his heart to God, gave his hand to the United Brethren Church in Dover. With these brethren he worshiped God loyally and faithfully until he removed to Tiskilwa, Ill., when he connected himself with the Methodist Episcopal Church. Soon after his conversion he felt called of God to

preach the gospel and in the spring of 1888 was examined before the quarterly conference at Tiskilwa and was granted a license to preach. He now humbly informed his pastor that he was willing to try to do anything in the line of Christian work he might suggest or require. He was invited to assist the Pastor and preached twice a month during the remainder of the Conference year.

In the fall of 1889 he was received on trial into the Central Illinois Conference and appointed by Bishop Ninde to the Zion and Munson Circuit. During this year Brother Middleton gave himself diligently to the work of a Pastor, and while witnessing the conversion of scores of souls, he had both churches on his charge repaired, doing much of the work with his own hands. During a revival season held in his Munson Church on one special evening, the entire large congregation was so touched by the Holy Spirit that all present but five were either at the altar as penitents or standing for the prayers of God's people. The writer frequently heard expressions of appreciation of this devoted Pastor and invariably the sentiment was, "He is one of God's Noblemen." In April of his second year his health began to fail, and a little later he was obliged to resign his charge.

In the month of July, hoping to regain his health he sought benefit from a western climate. But somehow God wanted him above, and to many it was evident that he would soon receive his discharge from the earthly warfare and have instead the victor's palm and crown. After returning unprofited from the west he made his home in Dover, Ill., where loving friends did all in their power for his comfort while he tarried on the earthward shore. All through his long illness he manifested remarkable patience and repeatedly said, "I am happy, let the Lord's will be done." On the 16th of August, 1888, he was united in marriage to Miss Sylvia E. Spaulding, who lovingly and faithfully shared with him the duties of an itinerant till his summons to come home. His death was triumphant, for he fell asleep in Jesus. Though gone he is loved and remembered, and though dead yet alive forevermore. The funeral services were held February 6th in the Congregational Church at Dover, and the sermon was preached by his old friend and former Pastor, J. F. Robinson, of Momence, Ill. Fellow clergymen served as pall-bearers and all that was mortal of Frank Middleton was laid to rest in the beautiful cemetery at Princeton, Ill., to await the eternal morning.

LAURA J. FISHER.

Laura J., oldest daughter of Truman and Laura Barnes, was born at Southington, Conn., February 25, 1820, and died in Chicago, Ill., November 17, 1891. When a child, she went with her parents to New Haven, Conn., and in her eighteenth year, in a covered wagon, journeyed to Illinois and settled near Canton. Her home with her parents was the centre of attraction. Love and helpfulness to and for each member was the ruling principle. Such a home and such influences were highly favorable to the development of a well rounded Christian character,

and her beautiful life is the conclusive proof that they were not lost upon the subject of this memoir.

On the 26th of December, 1844, she was united in marriage to Rev. Alexander Fisher and when the way opened for him to enter the itinerant work, she gladly performed her part. Faithfully and patiently she bore her share of the burdens and endured the hardships of an itinerant life. In the home, the Sunday school and the church her influence was felt for Christ. Her only child received in her home the training and instruction that made him, in after years, an efficient Minister of the gospel of Christ; and in many homes, on the charges where she lived her influence lingers still, and her memory is revered.

One year ago last October she had a severe stroke of paralysis, from which she seemed partially to recover, but in midsummer she began to fail, and the sun of her life rapidly declined till it sank peacefully to rest in a sea of glory. Dr. C. E. Mandeville, her pastor, assisted by Dr. E. Stone, an acquaintance for fifty years, conducted the funeral services at her home.

MRS. NELLIE E. GREEN.

Nellie E. Green, wife of Rev. Chas. W. Green, of the Central Illinois Conference, was born at Newark, Ill., May 30, 1858, and died at her home in Peoria, Ill., January 31, 1892, aged 33 years and 8 months. Her babe of two days preceded her one week to the home above. She leaves a husband and three children to mourn the loss of a true and devoted wife and mother.

Mrs. Green was converted and joined the M. E. Church in her childhood. She belonged to that growing number who learn to love and serve God from their infancy. She did not waver in her faith. Her experience was an ever growing one and she was remarkably even and beautiful in her life. Those who knew her best saw in her constantly the Christ life. When she was 14 years old she showed such a talent for sacred music and such proficiency in handling an organ that she was chosen organist of the church, and she continued in this important office in the church until the cares of her family made it impossible to give it the attention she thought it required. She loved Christ and the church. She was an exemplary Minister's wife, and during her itinerant life made many friends and left behind her an influence that told for Christ and His church. When her end drew nigh she had a great trial. It seemed so hard to leave her mourning husband and children behind; but after some time of earnest prayer to God and recalling of the promises of Christ, she obtained a great victory, she gave them into God's tender care, she rested quietly in his assurance and in this victory she died triumphantly, joying most of all that it would not be long until they would be reunited in the paradise of God.

A womanly woman, a Christian woman, a devoted, loving and lovable wife and mother, an exemplary Minister's wife, a helpful sympathetic spirit has gone out from among us, and while we are the poorer, the innumerable company of the redeemed spirits awaiting the final coronation is swelled by one, to the glory and praise of Christ the Saviour.

MRS. AGNES SCHAFFER.

Agnes Henderson was born in Wood county, Va., December 25, 1851. She was converted to God, and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church in December 1874. She was united in marriage to Rev. G. C. Schaffer February 28th, 1875. For sixteen years she did well the part of a Methodist minister's wife, making many friends in her quiet, modest manner, exemplifying a deep, conscious, Christian experience. To be known was to be loved, and the longer the acquaintance the higher she was esteemed. She was the mother of the home, caring for the children God had given them, four in number, one having preceded her as a light in the window beyond. Her health began to fail some time before her death. Every effort was made to stop that dread disease, consumption, without avail, and as a last resort a change of climate was made, and she returned to her father's home, the place of her childhood in West Virginia. For a time hope revived, but soon it was known to be but temporary, and the descent to the bank of the last river became rapid. Her faith, however, strengthened for the last conflict, and the victory over the last enemy, Death, was complete, grace never manifesting itself more wonderfully, and never did there close a Christian life more brightly and joyfully than Sister Schaffer's, on the 26th of December, 1891, with her husband, children and many sorrowing friends by her side, to whom she gave such evidences of God's power over death that her father and many of her friends who were unconverted have since accepted this religion as their faith and her church as their choice. Verily, "Blessed are they that die in the Lord, for their works do follow them."

MRS. H. A. WOOLISCROFT.

Mrs. H. A., wife of Rev. Absalom Wooliseroft and daughter of John and Sarah Nowland, of Kent County, Maryland, died at the residence of her son, J. N. Wooliseroft, at Holmesdale, Ky., June 1, 1892. Sister W. was married in Maysville, Ky., her husband being a member of the Kentucky Conference. Her husband was transferred in 1844 to the Rock River Conference and appointed to Lewistown, Ill. His next pastoral charge was Plattville, Wis., then Knoxville, Ill., then Victoria, then Washington, where he died. Sister Wooliseroft bore him company in the hardships and privations incident to the life of an itinerant Methodist preacher. She was the mother of five children, two of whom, J. N. Wooliseroft, of Holmesdale, Ky., and Mrs. Geo. P. Ayres, of New York City, survive her. She was a devoted mother, a firm friend, a faithful Christian. She had a mind of unusual depth, clearness and strength, and kept up her habits of reading and study until near the close of her life. She had gone eight years beyond the allotted "three score and ten" before she was called from her earthly to her heavenly home. It could truthfully be said that her life was filled with charity for all, and in her heart there was malice toward none. She died with her heart full of God's great love and in full anticipation of a blessed immortality.

SARA H. IMBODEN.

Sara W. Hayman, daughter of B. C. and S. A. Hayman, of Chicago, was born at Weston, Platte county, Missouri, August 10th, 1861. Her parents were of English birth, but came to America in 1854 and 1855, respectively. At the time of Sara's birth her father was in Denver, Col., having been compelled to leave Missouri on account of his outspoken Union sentiments. In 1862 he returned and removed with his family to Chicago, where they continued to reside. Sara's mother, who died in 1884, was a most devoted Christian, the influence of whose sweet and quiet spirit was felt by all who knew her, but most of all by this only daughter of her heart and home. As a consequence, she, also, was all her life noted for her gentle disposition, and for a certain air of refinement that characterized all her actions. In addition to the hallowed influence of her mother's teaching and example, and that of a pure and happy home life, she enjoyed the highest advantages of careful and liberal culture. Reared thus amid the refining influences of a Christian home, gifted and accomplished to an unusual degree, she was eminently fitted to adorn the highest walks of life. When it became known that she was to be a minister's wife, it was the common remark of her friends and acquaintances, that she was certainly qualified by nature, education and disposition, for that relation—to be a helpmeet to a minister of the Gospel; and, in the short experience she had, she fully justified this opinion by entering heartily and lovingly upon the duties of her new station.

December 29th, 1891, she was married to the Rev. Franklin W. Imboden, of the Central Illinois Conference. She went immediately with her husband to his charge at Iroquois, where a devoted people received them with hearty welcome. Mrs. Imboden won her way at once to all hearts. The duties of a pastor's wife are arduous, and not always pleasant, but she did not shrink from undertaking them. It is a wonderful thing that when God calls a man to the work of the ministry He generally calls some good woman to be his wife; and Sara Hayman was such a woman. Every gift of mind and heart—and she possessed many—was consecrated to the service of the Master. She was an accomplished musician, and had won many laurels in Chicago and elsewhere by her extraordinary skill as a pianist. This endowment also was at the command of the church. In the Sunday School of Centenary Church, with which she was connected, she was an efficient and faithful teacher; and, as a member of the Christian Work committee of the Epworth League, she gave invaluable assistance. During the last few years of her life she made remarkable advancement in Christian faith; and, months before the end came, she bore testimony of perfect trust in God. But she was not permitted to continue long in the work upon which she so cheerfully and hopefully entered; indeed, she may be said to have fallen a martyr to her devotion to duty. Several cases of typhoid fever in the vicinity called for her sympathy and assistance, and she undoubtedly

overtaxed her strength in visiting and caring for the sick. February 17th she was attacked by the fever, and was brought to her father's home in Chicago, where, notwithstanding the best medical skill was employed in her behalf, she died on the 15th of the following month. Thus, after less than three months of wedded life, at the very beginning of her career, she was called away, apparently before her time; and she, whose soul was imbued with the spirit of harmony, and whose deft fingers had so often awakened strains of such magic sweetness that every listener was entranced, was taken from the strife and discord of this rude world, to mingle with the angels and join in the minstrelsy of Heaven.

It is well with her; but our eyes are dim with weeping, and our hearts are very sad because we shall see her face on earth no more.

A.M. Stocking offered as a substitute that in paragraph 4 of section 2 the word "Conference" be substituted for the words "Board of Conference Stewards," and that paragraph 5 of the same section be stricken out.

On motion the substitute was laid on the table.

The amendment was adopted.

Section 2 as amended was then adopted.

Section 3 was read and adopted.

An addition to the report was offered by R. G. Pearce, and on motion of C. O. McCulloch it was referred back to the committee to be reported upon at the next session.

On motion of B. E. Kaufman the following addition to the report was made :

Resolved, That the one per cent. received on salaries from effective preachers be kept as a permanent fund, the revenue of which shall go to the annuity fund.

W. H. Hunter and R. Haney.—On motion of G. J. Luckey the Bishop was requested to appoint W. H. Hunter agent for the Conference Claimants' Society and Richard Haney Conference Evangelist.

Stewards' Report.—The Board of Stewards presented a preliminary report. G. J. Luckey moved to recommit the report to the Board of Stewards with power to act. Thomas Doney moved to amend by placing the name of J. A. Edmondson on the list as a necessitous case. The amendment prevailed and the motion as amended was carried.

On motion it was voted that when we adjourn we adjourn to meet at 3 o'clock p. m.

Dr. Earl Cranston was introduced and addressed the Conference in the interest of the Book Concern.

On motion of R. T. Ballew the time was extended.

Dr. Richard Haney was appointed to conduct the devotional exercises and to preside at the afternoon session until the Bishop should take the chair.

Announcements were made and on motion Conference adjourned.

The Doxology was sung and Bishop Fowler pronounced the Benediction.

The memoir of Mrs. Ella R. Metcalf was read by C. O. McCulloch and was followed by remarks by A. K. Tullis.

The memoir of Mrs. M. R. Cumming was read by G. J. Luckey, and Richard Haney followed with remarks.

The memoir of Mrs. Jane C. Hall was read by J. A. Edmondson.

Bishop Fowler took the chair

On motion of R. Haney, J. S. Cumming was requested to write a letter of condolence to E. P. Hall.

The report of the Committee on Memoirs was adopted.

The reading of the Journal of the morning session was deferred until the next session.

The name of William D. Benjamin was presented. The Committee on Examination reported and he was admitted on trial. On motion of B. F. Tallman the Bishop was requested to leave him without appointment to attend one of our schools.

J. C. Zeller, John May and C. E. Harvey, after report of examining committee, were admitted on trial.

Conference Funds.—The joint committee reported on a clause referred to them as addition to the plan for distribution of Conference Funds. G. W. Gray moved, as an amendment, to substitute the word request for require in the paper. The amendment prevailed and the report as amended was adopted.

On motion of C. O. McCulloch it was decided that the plan just adopted shall take effect at the close of this Conference Session.

A. M. Stocking.—On motion of M. A. Head the Bishop was requested to appoint A. M. Stocking Vice-President and Professor in Chaddock College.

Resolution.—R. B. Williams offered a resolution in reference to R. D. Russell. (See Resolutions.)

Official Record.—On motion of G. J. Luckey it was ordered that the printed minutes be the official record.

Bills.—Bills were presented for \$8.05 by W. H. Witter, Committee on Blanks, and for \$3.00 by the Secretary for expenses, and they were allowed and ordered paid from the Minute Fund.

B. W. Baker.—On motion of Thomas Doney the Bishop was requested to appoint B. W. Baker President of Chaddock College.

Examination.—O. T. Dwinell moved that the Committees of Examination be granted permission to examine members in the Conference Studies at a time other than at the Conference Session. The previous question was ordered. The motion prevailed by a count vote of 65 to 53.

S. A. Keen.—A resolution inviting S. A. Keen to be present at our next Conference was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

The Report of the Committee on Post Offices was read and approved.

It was voted that when we adjourn we adjourn to meet at 7:30 this evening.

Aaron Bower was appointed to lead the devotional services, and J. S. Cumming to preside at the evening session.

On motion Conference adjourned and Dr. Hunter pronounced the Benediction.

The report of the Committee on Book Accounts was read. G. W. Gray moved to amend section 4 by inserting the word "among." The previous question was ordered. The amendment prevailed, and the report as amended was adopted.

Notices were read. J. Q. Adams was appointed to lead the devotional service Monday morning. On motion Conference adjourned and C. W. Blodgett pronounced the Benediction.

David, President of Marionville Collegiate Institute, and Lauchlin McLean, State Secretary of the American Sabbath Union for Illinois.

Registrar.—On motion of G. J. Luckey, W. J. Minium was appointed Conference Registrar, to record the standing of the members in the course of studies, and he was authorized to purchase a book of record to be paid for from the Minute fund.

Neal Cards.—On motion of B. F. Eckley the committee on Blanks was instructed to send one of the Neal Cards to each Pastor.

Resolutions of thanks were read and adopted. (See Resolutions.)

Expenses.—On motion of R. D. Russell it was voted that an order for \$15.00 be drawn on the Minute Fund for local expenses to be paid to the Treasurer of the official board of the Geneseo church.

linquish all claim to any interest in the same. The Conference voted unanimously to grant the request.

The Statistical Secretary made his report which was adopted, and presented a bill for \$1.65 for expenses which was allowed and ordered paid from the Minute Fund.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH EXTENSION.

TO THE CENTRAL ILLINOIS CONFERENCE:—The Board of Church Extension of the Methodist Episcopal Church makes general statement of the work of twenty-seven years.

The organization of this work, though directed by the General Conference of 1864, was not completed until the latter part of 1865, and the work really began in 1866.

From 1866 to August, 1893, the Board has collected and disbursed in round numbers, (the exact figures change daily,).....\$4,885,750

Of this, the General Fund, derived chiefly from collections, but including special gifts for Frontier Churches, 250 each, and Mountain Fund specials of \$100 each, contained, for use by donations to churches.....\$3,135,000

The Loan Fund contains a permanent capital of.....\$863,900

And churches borrowing from it have returned.....\$886,850

\$1,750,750

Making the aggregate above given.....\$4,885,750

With this the Board has aided 8,942 Churches, more than one-third of the entire number owned by our Church.

Our Conference has shared in this work as follows:

The collections taken in our Churches from the beginning to November 1st, 1892, the close of the fiscal year of the Board have aggregated.....\$40,122 77

Churches within our bonds have received aid up to November 1st, 1892, the close of the last Church Extension year, to the number of sixty-eight.

By donations of..... \$14,614 15

And loans of..... 7,350 00

It is manifest that the efficiency and value of the Loan Fund depend upon the fidelity and promptness of Churches borrowing from it, in meeting their obligations. To fail in this is a most serious fault, which the Board in Philadelphia, as the custodians of the Fund, should not, under any circumstances permit. We urge our Churches to meet every obligation with the strictest fidelity.

Christianity In Earnest, being issued every three months, gives fresh and valuable information concerning Church Extension and suggestive discussions of this and kindred subjects. It is a great help to the pastors, and a larger circulation among our people, especially our official members, would promote the interest of this cause.

Glad Tidings, with its service of song and condensed information, is pre-eminently adapted for a Church Extension service in every Church and Sunday school. We cordially recommend its use in taking the Annual Collections.

Church Architecture has been greatly improved under the auspices of the Board, and we earnestly advise all who contemplate building to avail themselves of the facilities which the board has to offer.

In organizing new Churches and taking titles to Church property, there should be great care to conform to the laws of the State and the discipline of the Church. The necessary information is now accessible to all in the book on Laws and Forms for Churches, prepared by Dr. A. J. Kynett. This and the necessary blank forms can be obtained of him.

We recommend for adoption the following resolutions:

1. We congratulate the Church upon the great work accomplished by our Board of Church Extension, and commend it to the enlarged liberality of all our people.

2. The fact that our country is new, that our population doubles in less than thirty years, so that within another quarter of a century we shall exceed a hundred millions of people, and that the powers of evil are intensely active, demand that the work of Church Extension shall be greatly enlarged in the quarter of a century to come.

3. We will not be content until, in the enlargement of this work under the direction of the General Committee and Board of Church Extension, we shall fully perform the part assigned us as a Conference.

4. In order to do this we will, in our several appointments, avail ourselves of the helps provided by the Board, in Christianity In Earnest and Glad Tidings, and will endeavor to lead all our Churches to respond in full to the call made upon them in pursuance of the plans of the discipline.

5. That some Sunday in the early part of the year be observed as Church Extension Day and the collection be lifted for the Board.

We find there has been an increase over last year of \$69.00.

Especially do we appreciate the visit to our Conference and the inspiring words spoken by the Editor, Dr. W. V. Kelly.

4. That we recognize the Christian Advocate, New York, as among the first in Christian journalism, but in no sense taking the place of the other Advocates in their special fields.

5. That we will be loyal to our Northwestern Christian Advocate and by all possible means increase its circulation, regarding it as unique in presenting the great moral facts and religious truths for the Northwest.

6. That we rejoice in the unprecedented circulation of the Epworth Herald, being the largest of any denominational weekly, and hail it as an evangel of life and power among our noble young people.

7. That the Junior League department of the Herald is breathing new life and inspiration into the young and helping them in the choice of good reading. We will endeavor to enlarge its power by still increasing its circulation.

8. That we most heartily commend to our people the World Wide Missions, published by our Missionary secretaries.

9. That our preachers ought to feel it an imperative obligation to make prompt settlement for all accounts with the Book Concern.

10. That the cases of all members of the Conference who make no effort to settle their book accounts, allowing them to stand for three years and making no arrangement with the Book Concern, by the next session of our conference, be referred to Committee on Conference Relation.

11. That we rejoice in the blessing secured to our superannuates by the great prosperity of the Book Concern.

12. That if any Conference Claimant is in debt to the Book Concern that ten per cent. of amount received from the Conference be retained each year until the whole is paid.

13. That a permanent committee consisting of one from each district be appointed to co-operate with the Book Agents in collecting accounts.

14. That we request the General Book Committee to take such further action as may be practicable for the protection of Book Concern dividends.

EDUCATION.

The Committee on Education respectfully reports as follows:

HEDDING COLLEGE.

We note with pleasure the continued prosperity of Hedding College under the able administration of Dr. Evans.

With a capable faculty and the marked religious tone of the institution—90 per cent of its students being Christians—we cannot too highly commend it to those seeking a safe as well as efficient school of learning.

A new steel roof and a fresh coat of paint at an expense of \$1,200 are the last among a series of improvements amounting to over \$6,000 in four years.

The attendance has increased during the past four years from 106 to 222 and that of undergraduates from 16 to 65.

The maintenance of this institution is essential to the interests of Methodism in western Illinois, and we recommend a ready co-operation with Dr. Evans in his efforts to thoroughly endow the institution. In accordance with the recommendation of the Trustees we recommend the following appointments:

GRAND PRAIRIE SEMINARY.

We believe the Seminary has for a number of years made substantial and steady growth. It now has three good buildings. A suitable Chapel and Conservatory building were completed and dedicated early in the Conference year.

The attendance has been good and notwithstanding the unfavorable general condition of the country, the fall term opens with an excellent enrollment.

We approve the proposition advanced by the Trustees to secure endowments for the support of scholarship and professorship.

We report with pleasure that several scholarships are established, and that several important bequests have been made, aggregating \$20,000 or \$25,000.

We recommend to the patrons of education, that they not only care for the present needs of this useful institution but that they make ample provisions for its future enlargement and improvement. We believe that at least \$50,000 should soon be added to its permanent and productive endowment.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. S. VanPelt, President; and Rev. C. E. Pickett, Professor, in the Seminary; and J. Rogers, R. B. Williams, L. F. Cullom, J. E. Mercer, J. Wilkinson, H. D. Clark, Thos. Doney and J. W. Haney as Conference Visitors.

ILLINOIS WESLEYAN UNIVERSITY.

We are happy to report that the Illinois Wesleyan University, situated at Bloomington, Illinois, is enjoying a period of unusual prosperity.

The roster of the last year shows an attendance of fourteen hundred and twenty-eight students in the various departments of Letters, Music, Art and Law.

The income from tuitions and endowment, more than paid current expenses.

During the last summer a tract of ground has been purchased for the erection of a Gymnasium, and the buildings are nearly completed.

The endowment fund has been increased by the addition of \$50,000 during the last year.

Mr. Geo. Lichtenthaler, deceased, has bequeathed his magnificent conchological collection to this Institution. In the securing of this treasure, Mr. L. travelled extensively, expended large means and occupied more than forty years.

Four members of this Conference have purchased and presented to the University, working libraries for the use of the departments of Latin and Greek.

A course of study of the English Bible has been formed and is a requirement in the Sophomore and Junior years.

The Post-Graduate courses have had more matriculants than ever before. Any one may enter this non-resident course by completing the curriculum leading to the degree Ph. B., or its equivalent.

Students in this preliminary course must complete algebra, and plane geometry, and have read Cæsar and Cicero.

A fine preliminary course in English, leading to the same degree has also been provided for such as cannot pursue the prescribed Latin.

We respectfully nominate as Trustees: F. H. Cumming, C. O. McCulloch, B. W. Baker and W. B. Harvey. We recommend as Visitors: J. S. Cumming, R. Crewes, J. W. Frizzelle, T. Doney, M. V. Crumbaker, T. W. McVety.

SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY, DE PAUW UNIVERSITY.

This Theological School for young men preparing for the Christian Ministry has had a year of increased prosperity.

We heartily commend it to our young men who are desirous of a thorough and efficient training for the Ministry.

We recommend Rev. John Small and D. B. Johnson as Conference Visitors.

NORTHWESTERN UNIVERSITY.

The past year of this great institution of learning has been attended with prosperity to such a degree, that in number of students it now has only two or three peers among all the higher institutions of learning in America, the catalogue giving the magnificent list of 2,463 students. At the last Commencement degrees were conferred on 365 graduates. This institution has been thoroughly unified; gratifying gains have been made in equipment; the new building of the College of Pharmacy has been erected and a commodious addition to the Woman's Hall provided; extensive and valuable additions to the museum have been made; and the magnificent Orrington Lunt Library building is now in process of erection. The courses of instruction in all the Colleges are being raised to the standard of the highest demand of the age and the corps of instructors is being rapidly enlarged by the addition of new professors. We recommend that Rev. J. W. Haney, D. D., be continued as Conference Trustee for the ensuing term.

GARRETT BIBLICAL INSTITUTE.

The past year has been one of most gratifying success in the history of the Garrett Biblical Institute. One hundred and eighty-three students have been in attendance.

For the first time in the history of this school, a testimonial of scholarship was required as a condition of admission to the classes.

The courses of study have been enlarged and varied so as to furnish the widest practical theological study in the time at our disposal.

It is hoped that young men who are deficient in preliminary education will be recommended to the Academy or College rather than the Institute. Superior work is done and can only be done with those who have already acquired a collegiate training.

The library is steadily growing, and theses are required on various topics in the several departments of Theological Encyclopedia.

We recommend as Conference visitors, Revs. J. W. Frizzelle and R. E. Buckey.

THE AMERICAN UNIVERSITY.

The establishment of a great Protestant University at Washington, D. C., under the supervision of the Methodist Episcopal Church, is a

most worthy undertaking. It is our judgment that so large an amount as \$10,000,000 should be put upon the heart of the wealthy men of the nation who are capable of giving their hundreds of thousands. We commend to these men this enterprise as worthy of their confidence and liberal help.

WOMAN'S COLLEGE OF BALTIMORE.

Resolved, That we, as a Conference, heartily believe in the co-education of the sexes, but we recognize the imperative need for educational institutions for girls.

We therefore call attention to the excellent advantages of the "Woman's College," of Baltimore, Rev. J. F. Goncher, D. D., President.

We recommend the appointment of Revs. C. O. McCulloch, F. W. Merrell and H. D. Clark, as Conference visitors.

We recommend that such charges as so elect shall have the right to establish scholarships, of not less than \$1,000 and to apply the regular collections for education upon the same annually until the amount shall be raised. Charges thus establishing scholarships shall have the right to name the same and to nominate the beneficiary.

Resolved, That the collections for Education be retained for distribution among the three Conference schools.

Resolved, That the distribution of said funds be in proportion to the number entitled to be beneficiaries according to the law of the Church coming from the bounds of the Conference, and that such money shall be a part of the permanent endowment of the schools.

Resolved, That these funds be reported to the Conference Treasurer to be disbursed at the next session of the Conference, on the basis of the accredited statements from the several schools.

We are sorry to learn that either the recommendation of the Conference to the Presiding Elders has not been carried out, or their instructions have been disregarded by many of the Pastors, for we find that in six of the Districts (one to hear from) 70 charges are found that have not strictly followed out paragraph 280 of the Discipline, some paying nothing.

There has been apportioned to this Conference for the ensuing year, on the basis of Ministerial Support, the sum of \$2,054, with the suggestion that such methods be used as will raise the same.

Resolved, That the Presiding Elders be instructed to see that the provisions of the Discipline touching the pro rata division of funds be strictly carried out.

EPWORTH LEAGUE REPORT.

We rejoice in the increased prosperity of the Epworth League, and in the very general and thorough organization of our young people into Chapters.

Both in our own Conference and throughout the Church we note with joy the onward march of this militant host and believe that it is becoming more and more effective in the Master's service.

While some League literature is being disseminated, we believe there is urgent need of a better system for the distribution of good books and periodicals, and recommend the establishing of League libraries in all our charges. We also urge our Leagues to organize Reading Circles using our Epworth League Reading Course.

The Epworth Herald fully sustains its former reputation and should be in the homes of all our people, and we pledge ourselves to do our part toward securing a subscription list of a hundred thousand.

We trust that none of our pastors will be indifferent, and would urge upon each Preacher and Presiding Elder the importance of co-operation in District and Conference work.

We recommend the immediate organization of Epworth Guards as widely as possible, and of incorporating systematic Bible study into League programs at all our Conventions.

We appreciate highly the spirit and work of our General Secretary, Dr. E. A. Schell, whose addresses have given such inspiration at the sessions of this Conference.

FREEDMEN'S AID AND SOUTHERN EDUCATION SOCIETY.

We rejoice that God has continued to smile upon the work of this Society, making the last quadrennium the best in its history; there being an increase in its finances of \$357,196.92, and an enlargement of its work corresponding with this increase.

Its schools were never in better condition than they are at present, but with a Church membership in the South of 503,408, white and

colored, and a population of 4,715,381 who cannot write, it becomes an imperative necessity that there be enlarged contributions that there may be increased activity in this important work.

The apportionment to our Conference for the coming year, \$4,300, which it is desired may be apportioned by the Presiding Elders, to the various charges in our bounds, and that such information may be furnished as will insure the collection of said apportionment.

We recommend to all our brothers the "Christian Educator," a quarterly furnished for fifty cents a year or one dollar for four years. Also two charts showing location of schools, buildings, and other valuable information; our Southern Education Day services and envelopes for subscriptions. These helps will be furnished free on application.

Let us pray that the blessing of God may continue to rest upon this great work.

SANCTITY OF THE SABBATH.

We, the Committee on the Sanctity of the Sabbath, submit the following report:

WHEREAS, The word of God declares the Sabbath to be divinely instituted and adapted to meet the physical, mental, moral and spiritual needs of mankind, and

WHEREAS, The Sabbath as instituted by Deity is to be observed, not as a holiday, but as a holy day; a day of rest and worship, and

WHEREAS, God has interposed to vindicate His Sacred Day before the eyes of all the nations of Earth, in connection with the Columbian Exposition now in progress, therefore,

Resolved, That we "Thank God and take courage." We will with renewed earnestness preach against Sabbath desecration in every form, recognizing that the highest interests of the home, the church and the nation demand the Christian Sabbath. We will lift up our voices against Sunday visiting; against railroad travel or traffic; against all huckstering on our camp grounds and against all pleasuring on God's

holy day. We will endeavor, with all our might to enforce upon all to whom we preach, right views touching this question.

We commend the important work of the associations organized to secure the proper observance of the Sabbath at the Columbian Exposition, and especially would we express our gratification that one of our own number, Rev. L. McLean, has so efficiently labored in this behalf.

STATE OF THE CHURCH.

Your Committee on the State of the Church presents the following report :

We are grateful to God for the material, intellectual and spiritual prosperity that has attended our beloved church during the past year. New church buildings have been erected, old ones have been repaired and beautified, parsonages have been built and furnished, and the liberality of our people has been shown in their generous support of the pastors and their gifts to the various benevolences of the church. The work of Christian education has received a new impetus through the literary department of the Epworth League, and our church schools have been unusually successful, giving special attention to the development of Christian character among the students. The spiritual condition of the churches has been well maintained, and while revivals have not been so extensive as in some former years, we rejoice to know that there have been conversions in nearly all our charges. The outlook is hopeful and with confidence we enter upon the work of another year, looking for the outpouring of the Spirit and a great ingathering of saved men and women.

But while we find much in which to rejoice, there are perils that ought not to be overlooked.

1. CLASS MEETINGS.—We regret to believe that the old time class meeting of Methodism has in many of our charges been neglected, to the injury of the spirituality of those charges. By some Pastors the provisions of the Discipline for the appointment of class leaders are ignored and one or two leaders are appointed for a membership of several hundred. Ministers who have taken a solemn pledge to obey the rules of the Discipline ought not as administrators to ignore its plain requirements and we recommend that the Presiding Elders urge upon the pastors the importance of complying with the provisions of the Discipline upon this subject.

2. THE SUNDAY-SCHOOL.—The Sunday-School as an auxiliary to the church possesses wonderful facilities for the religious training of children, but we cannot avoid the conviction that many of our people have substituted the Sunday-School for home training and also for the public worship of God. We cannot too strongly urge upon our people the importance of religious training in the home and the regular attendance of children and young people upon the preaching of the Word. Parents ought to be in the Sunday-School and children should be with their parents in the public congregation.

3. THE EPWORTH LEAGUE. We hail with delight the wonderful growth of the Epworth League. We see in the League not only an or-

ganization admirably adapted to the development of our young people in Christian experience and activity, but also a greatly needed provision for supplying an interesting and attractive social life that may be an acceptable substitute for questionable amusements. We are glad to believe that most excellent results, in this direction, have already been reached, and yet we cannot disguise the fact that there is a great peril in a tendency, developed in some places, to make the early Sunday evening league meeting a substitute for the preaching service. No other service, however important, should ever take the place of attendance upon the preaching of the Word, and great care should be taken to maintain a high standard of piety in our leagues.

4. QUESTIONABLE AMUSEMENTS.—We regret that in many places the prohibitions of our Discipline concerning a line of popular amusements, are not observed, and we strongly urge that pastors, before receiving probationers into full connection shall see that they understand the provisions of the Discipline upon this subject.

5. SABBATH DESECRATION.—After wide observation and careful consideration, we are convinced that the great peril to evangelical Christianity in America is found in the tendency to Sabbath desecration. The general government is deeply involved in this guilt through its extensive Sunday mail service, the great transportation corporations have no regard for the sanctity of the Sabbath, and the climax of iniquity in the line of Sabbath desecration has been reached by the reprehensible conduct of the World's Fair directors in outraging the Christian sentiment of this country by opening the World's Fair on Sunday. This act, together with the wicked connivance of the courts to force this iniquity upon an unwilling and indignant people, constitutes the crowning disgrace of our country before the world. Justice, however, compels us to admit that this terrible disgrace was made possible by the evident laxness of sentiment and practice on this subject among the Christian people of our country. Had Christian people shown the courage of their convictions by maintaining in their practice the sanctity of the Christian Sabbath, the directory would not have entertained the proposition for an open Sunday. When preachers and church members travel on Sunday trains, encourage Sunday railroad excursions to camp-meetings, allow huckster stands to vend articles not necessary for man or beast, on Sunday at camp-meetings, and turn the Holy Sabbath into a day of business by charging an admission fee to camp grounds on that day, we must not be surprised if secular organizations and politicians have but little regard for the sacredness of our Sabbath. It is time for the church to call a halt and for the pulpit, with warning voice, to enforce the command, "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy." We earnestly advise both preachers and people to avoid the use of Sunday trains and we insist that those who have charge of our camp-meetings shall either abandon the Sunday camp-meeting or so arrange for the Sabbath that nothing of a questionable character shall be tolerated on that Holy day.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND TRACTS.

1. SUNDAY SCHOOLS.—We rejoice in the grand work being done by the Sunday School Union of the Methodist Episcopal Church as evidenced by the fact that during the year 1892, under direction of this Board, 730 new schools were organized, and we call attention to the growth and importance of the work in our Church, embracing 28,223 schools, with 310,162 officers and teachers and 2,369,782 scholars.

Out of the Sunday school ranks of the Church last year, 116,966 conversions were reported.

The vital interests to the Church resulting from a work so vast renders it necessary that the greatest care should be exercised in the selection of teachers, that the best men and women be chosen to have immediate charge of the class instruction.

We recommend our own publications as the very best Sunday school helps extant and best adapted to the use of Methodist schools.

We greatly appreciate the work of the Sunday School Union which during the past year has aided more than 3,000 schools, and we urge upon our pastors to see to it that the apportionment for this cause be met in full on each charge.

We further recommend that the sum of \$850, the amount asked of the Conference, be apportioned among the charges.

2. TRACT CAUSE.—Next to the voice of the preacher in effectiveness stands the printed page, and in inexpensiveness, convenience and ease of circulation the religious tract commends itself as a means of diffusing gospel truth. The tract society of our church affords a vast assortment of religious literature in brief, convenient form, which is at the service of our pastors and tract committees of which the board has generously offered to grant to each contributing charge a donation of tracts equal in value to one half of the sum contributed to the cause of said charge.

We, your committee, call attention to the fact that the tract society is an efficient aid to the great missionary enterprise of the Church in its contribution to the cause of missions of from \$6,000 to \$7,000 per year in aid of our printing presses and book and tract circulation in foreign languages and we recommend that the sum of \$850, the same being the amount asked of our Conference by the board, be apportioned by the Presiding Elders among the charges for the ensuing year, and we further urge that the pastors use all diligent means to raise the amount in each case.

TEMPERANCE AND CONSTITUTIONAL PROHIBITION.

Your Committee on Temperance and the Prohibition of the Liquor Traffic report the following for adoption:

Resolved, That we endorse the action of the last General Conference on the subject of Temperance and the prohibition of the liquor traffic as follows:

1. PROGRESS AND DUTY.

We are profoundly grateful to God for the progress already made in every phase of the Temperance reform, and hold it to be the privilege

and duty of the Methodist Episcopal Church, both to save the fallen and to wage an increasingly aggressive warfare against the liquor traffic.

2. PERSONAL ABSTINENCE.

The word of God, the teachings of science and the lessons of experience, all combine in declaring total abstinence from intoxicating beverages to be the duty of every individual.

3. OTHER ORGANIZATIONS.

We are in sympathy with and bid a hearty godspeed to all organizations, of every name and nature, that seek to promote the cause of total abstinence and accomplish the overthrow of the liquor traffic.

4. ATTITUDE TOWARDS THE TRAFFIC.

We reiterate the language of the Episcopal Address of 1888: "The liquor traffic is so pernicious in all its bearings, so inimical to the interests of honest trade, so repugnant to the moral sense, so injurious to the peace and order of society, so hurtful to the home, to the church and to the body politic, and so utterly antagonistic to all that is precious in life, that the only proper attitude towards it for Christians is that of relentless hostility. It can never be legalized without sin."

We concur with the Episcopal Address of 1892, where it is declared: "In our judgment the saloon is an unmixed evil, full of diabolism, a disgrace to our civilization, the chief corrupter of political action, and a continual menace to the order of society and the peace and purity of our homes."

Believing, as we do, that the traffic in intoxicating beverages sustains the relation of an efficient cause to the vice of intemperance, we hold that no member of the Methodist Episcopal Church can consistently contribute by voice, vote or influence to the perpetuation and protection of that traffic.

We declare before all the world that the Church of God ought to be known always and everywhere as the relentless and uncompromising foe of this ungodly business, and that it is the duty of every Christian to wage ceaseless warfare against it.

5. ATTITUDE TOWARDS THE TRAFFICKER AND HIS SUPPORTERS.

We emphatically declare that men engaged in the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages ought not to receive the commercial patronage of Christian people, nor should those who either directly or indirectly sustain the liquor traffic receive the suffrages of Christian men.

6. THE LICENSE SYSTEM.

License laws are the liquor traffic's strongest bulwark of defense. They are wrong in principle and impotent for good. We are unalterably opposed to the enactment of laws that propose, by license, taxing or otherwise, to regulate the drink traffic, because they provide for its continuance and afford no protection against its ravages.

We will accept no compromise, but demand the unconditional surrender of the rebellious business.

7. GOVERNMENT AND THE TRAFFIC.

We rejoice in the clear announcement of the Supreme Court of the United States touching the saloon question, as follows: "The State cannot by any contract limit the exercise of her power to the prejudice of the public health and the public morals." "No legislation can bargain away the public health or the public morals. The public themselves cannot do this, much less their servants. Government is organized with a view to their preservation, and cannot divest itself of the power to provide for them." "There is no inherent right in a citizen to thus sell intoxicating liquors by retail; it is not a privilege of a citizen of the State, or a citizen of the United States." "The statistics of every State show a greater amount of crime and misery attributable to the use of ardent spirits obtained at these liquor saloons than to any other cause." "By the general concurrence of opinion of every civilized and Christian community there are few sources of crime and misery in society equal to the dramshop, where intoxicating liquors in small quantities, to be drunk at the time, are sold indiscriminately to all parties applying." "The great principle of the common law, which is equally the teaching of Christian morality, is so to use one's property as not to injure others."

Commending the United States Senate for its action in the premises, we condemn the Lower House of our national Congress for its repeated refusal to pass the bills providing for the appointment of a national commission of inquiry to investigate and report upon the influence of the liquor traffic upon the material and moral welfare of the country.

We insist that the United States Government, and the various State Governments, in tolerating the liquor traffic for a money consideration, are guilty of wicked complicity with a business whose awful work of destruction brands it as alike an enemy to God and man.

We desire especially to place ourselves on record as repudiating to the utmost of our ability the action of the General Government, through the department of State, in prostituting its powers, at the request of American brewers and maltsters to collect information, and to use the machinery of the Government to promote the sale of liquors in South American countries.

8. POLITICAL ACTION.

We recommend all members of the Methodist Episcopal Church who enjoy the elective franchise to so use that solemn trust as to promote the rescue of our country from the guilt and dishonor which have been brought upon it by criminal complicity with the liquor traffic.

We do not presume to dictate the political conduct of our people, but we do record our deliberate judgment that no political party has a right to expect, nor ought it to receive the support of Christian men, so long as it stands committed to the license policy or refuses to put itself on record in an attitude of open hostility to the saloons.

Resolved, That this report shall not be construed as an endorsement of any political party.

We rejoice that the Evangelical Churches of all lands agree with us in our attitude toward the saloon. The one thing needful is that we

shall come together, and act together concentrating on this one thing and persevere, therefore

Resolved, That we invite co-operation upon the following platform.

OBJECT:—

1. The strict enforcement of the suppressive measures of existing laws.

2. The early enactment of more stringent laws for the destruction of the liquor traffic.

3. The final adoption of Constitutional Prohibition for every state and nation."

DECLARATION:—

1. "Primary allegiance to God and mankind, to our country and commonwealth.

2. All party measures subordinate to these higher aims.

3. Liberty to choose political affiliations but freedom from the liquor power through any party."

Resolved, "That we seek to have all workers enrolled, a company in every town, a brigade in every county, a division in every city, an army corps in every state, a conquering army in the nation, a country without a saloon. Eternal vigilance." "Here we stand and seek co-operation offensive and defensive with all who are likeminded."

Resolved, That we recommend that the Temperance Society of our Conference co-operate with the Christian Temperance Alliance inaugurated by the Temperance Committee of the General Conference.

Resolved, That we request the Presiding Elders to urge the organization of temperance leagues in all their charges.

Reports of Special Committees.

DISTRIBUTION OF CONFERENCE FUNDS.

TO THE CENTRAL ILLINOIS ANNUAL CONFERENCE:—The joint committee appointed at the last session of the Central Illinois Conference to devise and report a plan for the distribution of the funds of the Conference for the support of superannuated ministers, widows and children of deceased ministers, recommend the following plan for your consideration and action, viz:

SUSTENTATION OF SUPERANNUATES. (THE ANNUITY PLAN.)

I. COLLECTIONS.

Each congregation shall observe a Sunday to be known as Veterans' Day, upon which the pastor shall present this cause to the members of the church and emphasize their obligations to the Conference Claim-

ants; a collection shall be taken in the public congregation for the support of Conference Claimants separate from any other interest.

II. DISTRIBUTION.

All moneys received for annual distribution in aid of the support of Conference Claimants shall be divided into two sums:

The first, consisting of seventy-five per cent. of the whole, shall be called the Annuity fund, the second, consisting of twenty-five per cent. of the whole, shall be called the Necessitous fund.

All superannuated ministers, the widows, and children under fifteen years of age, of deceased ministers, shall be Conference Claimants, unless the claim be voluntarily relinquished, and all sums thus relinquished shall be added to the Necessitous fund.

The Annuity fund shall be divided among the Claimants upon the following basis: Each minister, and the widow of each deceased minister shall receive annually ten dollars for each year of his or her effective service. These claims shall be paid pro-rata from the moneys in hand.

The Necessitous fund shall be divided among the Claimants, whether superannuates, widows or children, whose annuities are insufficient for their needs, in such proportions as the board of Conference Stewards may deem equitable.

The gross allowance to each Claimant from the above funds shall be reported to and approved by the Annual Conference.

WHEREAS, The carrying out of this plan will require an increased income for the support of Conference Claimants, therefore

Resolved, That each member of the Conference shall be required to contribute annually to the above fund one per cent. of his net salary received and all claimants shall give one per cent. of the amount they receive from the Conference funds, except the necessitous cases.

The above plan was adopted at the joint meeting of the committees of the Central Illinois Conference and Conference Claimants' Society at the First M. E. Church, Peoria, Ill., June 28, 1893.

The Conference Claimants' Society shall be collector and custodian of the one per cent. paid by the Preachers and Claimants.

Resolved, That each Preacher in charge be requested to bring up his Conference Claimants' collection in proportion to his salary paid or in full.

Resolved, That each member of the Conference, in the effective relation, who fails to pay into the general fund one per cent. of his salary, be charged up with the same, and if at the end of the year it remains unpaid a record of the same be made against him so that at the time of his superannuation the basis of his allowance from the Annuity fund be the number of years he served in the effective work minus the number of years he has failed to pay one per cent. of his salary into the general fund.

DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

Your committee report the following constitution for the organization of a Conference Domestic Missionary Society.

CONSTITUTION.

ART. I. NAME.—This society shall be known as the Central Illinois Conference Domestic Missionary Society.

ART. II. OBJECT.—The object of this society shall be:

1. To aid needy churches in supporting pastors.
2. To provide for the preaching of the Gospel in destitute localities.
3. To provide for the distribution of religious literature.
4. To aid in the Deaconess work whenever a Deaconess home or homes shall be established within the bounds of the Conference.

ART. III. MEMBERSHIP.—All members of the Central Illinois Conference shall be members of this society.

ART. IV. OFFICERS AND MANAGERS.—The officers of this Society shall consist of a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, and there shall be ten Managers, five of whom shall be ministers and five laymen, all of whom shall be elected annually by the Central Illinois Conference upon the nomination of the Committee on Domestic Missions.

ART. V. BOARD OF CONTROL.—The officers and managers shall constitute a Board of Control that shall have full power to determine the merit of all applications for assistance and make such appropriations as they may deem advisable and the condition of the treasury may warrant.

ART. VI. MEETINGS OF THE BOARD.—The Board of Control shall have an annual meeting at such time as the President may appoint during Conference week and at the place of the Conference session. There shall also be a semi-annual meeting on the first Tuesday in April to be held in the First M. E. Church in the city of Peoria. The President may call special meetings at the same place as necessity may require.

ART. VII. APPROPRIATIONS:

1. All appropriations must be made by the Board of Control.
2. The Presiding Elders shall be the official representatives of the wants of their districts and shall have the right to participate in all discussions relative to applications for aid.
3. The Treasurer shall pay out money only upon orders signed by the President and Secretary issued in harmony with the action of the Board of Control.

ART. VIII. FUNDS:

1. Every Pastor within the bounds of the Conference shall present the claims of this society to his people and take a collection some time in November of each year and immediately forward the amount of said collection to the Treasurer.
2. Bequests shall be solicited by the Pastors and reported to the Treasurer.

ART. IX. REPORTS.—The Board of Control shall, through its Treasurer, make a full report to the Central Illinois Conference at each annual session.

ART. X. This constitution may be changed by the Central Illinois Conference assembled in annual session.

sand dollars necessary to said endowment, amounting to six hundred dollars per annum, and that the surplus amounts of such collections and contributions, after the payment of said interest, be credited to the Conference on the principal of the endowment.

Resolved, 3. That the Conference will proceed to the election of one minister and one layman to represent this body in the advisory council of Wesley Hospital which minister and layman shall serve as Trustees for the Conference, if the charter is so changed as to admit of Conference representation in said Board of Trustees before the meeting of this Annual Conference and that said minister be Rev. M. A. Head, of Rock Island and layman, A. Dean, of Galesburg, Ill.

Resolved, 4. That the six hundred dollars necessary be divided equally between the seven Districts.

Resolved, 5. That each Pastor during the year observe some Sunday as Wesley Hospital Day and lift a collection and the collection be forwarded to Rev. H. D. Clark, who shall be Treasurer of the fund.

Resolved, 6. That each Presiding Elder be requested in the ensuing year to call the attention of the first Quarterly Conference to the Hospital and the action of the Annual Conference, thus materially aiding the pastors in presenting the work to the people.

Memoirs.

REV. C. H. BRACE.

Chas. H. Brace was born in Elmira, Stark county, Illinois, July 25, 1841. He was educated at Toulon Academy, and Union Seminary, in Paw Paw Grove, Ill.

He enlisted in April, 1861, and belonged to Co. B., 19th Ill. Volunteers, served as sergeant until ill health demanded a discharge.

He was converted and joined the M. E. Church, Feb. 15, 1859. He was licensed the year following as a local preacher and was received into the Central Illinois Conference at Pekin, September, 1870, and appointed to Lawn Ridge charge. From that time until October, 1882, he was on the effective list, when in consequence of trouble in his throat, he took a superannuated relation. He served the following charges: Lawn Ridge, Sparland, Oneida, Kirkwood, Wenona, Eureka, El Paso and Pekin.

He went to Minneapolis, December, 1884, hoping to regain his shattered health. This hope was partially realized. His head, throat and chest troubles largely disappeared, while the heart trouble grew more serious the last two years. Every hour his family were in dread lest the affliction should prove fatal, but he seemed much better the last few months of his life.

In Minneapolis he was engaged in business and at the same time served one year as pastor of the First M. E. Church in St. Cloud and two years as pastor at Minnehaha.

He was twice married and was the father of six children, all living; four of the first marriage and two of the second.

His first wife was from Toulou, and died in March, 1878, while he was Pastor at Wenona. He was married again to Mrs. Delia M. Judson, at Wenona, Ill., July 7, 1879.

He was a good man, deeply pious; and a friend who could be trusted. As a preacher he was methodical, clear and earnest, always successful in securing the conversion of sinners and the edification of believers. He was a very diligent and successful pastor. His best work was probably done in Oneida, where in three years every interest of the Church

was advanced, a large number of persons were converted, the house of worship repaired and beautified and the parsonage greatly improved. Though seventeen years have passed, the people speak of his pastorate as one of the most successful in the history of the charge.

Enjoying the work of his ministry and loving the brethren of his Conference, it was a great trial, when failing health forced him to give up this delightful and holy toil, but he humbly submitted to what he regarded as the order of Providence.

Last October he went on a three weeks' business tour into North Dakota, returning to Minneapolis on the 8th of November. His train was four hours late. He stepped from the train, walked into the waiting room and sat down. A few moments later, without a struggle, the spark of life went out and his freed spirit returned to God. He leaves a wife and children almost overwhelmed with grief because of his sad and sudden departure. But while they mourn doubtless he rejoices, in the presence of the Master whom he loved, with all those who have entered within the veil before him.

ELIJAH RANSOM.

Elijah Ransom was born in Vienna, N. Y., April 1, 1820. When twenty-three he came to Illinois, and Sept. 19, 1844, was married to Miss Mary J. Irvine of Byron, Ill. His ministerial career began, when, in March, 1845, he became a licensed exhorter in the church. Two years later he was licensed as a local preacher. The following fall he was employed by Elihu Springer to travel the Palmyra circuit, Milwaukee district, Wisconsin Conference. On this circuit a glorious revival attended his ministry. One year later he was received on trial in the Rock River Conference, and appointed to the Crystal Lake circuit as junior preacher, with Rev. Luke Hitchcock, Presiding Elder. From that time his appointments were successively: Little Rock circuit, one year; Freedom mission, one year; Ottawa circuit, one year. At this time the Rock River Conference was divided, and this circuit fell into what is now the Central Illinois Conference, with which body he labored until 1863. At that time, he was Presiding Elder of Rock Island district. Nov. 23, 1863, he enlisted for the war, and went as chaplain of the thirteenth Illinois Infantry. He passed through the siege and surrender of Vicksburg, after which being disabled, he was ordered to the hospital, and sometime afterwards he was honorably discharged. Sixteen years ago, he superannuated and came to Oregon, Ill. His last days were burdened with disability, but he died peacefully at the home of his only child, Mrs. E. C. Reynolds, Feb. 1, 1893, his wife having died a few years before his death.

He was a fine specimen of physical manhood. He was considerably over six feet in height, and was said to be the largest man in the Conference. He had a good mind, was educated in the public schools, and for some years was a successful teacher. As a preacher, he was plain and practical, sometimes rising with the occasion, and inspired with his theme, he reached the sublime heights of eloquence. He was always a successful pastor, leading sinners to Christ, and building up the Church in holiness. In all the charges in which he served, he left a record for

earnest and effective service. He belonged to the old, and rapidly disappearing host of the "thundering legion," who planted the standard of Methodism in this country, and led the hosts on to victory.

For several years he was a great sufferer from nervous prostration, occasionally falling, as if stricken with death. In view of his protracted affliction, it seemed a mercy, when the Master said, "It is enough; come up higher." During all the years of his suffering, he thought of his Conference, and annually sent messages of love to his brethren. He was a good man, and has doubtless gone to join "the great majority before the throne."

GEORGE W. BROWN.

George W. Brown was born in Monroeville, Ohio August 28, 1815. August 22, 1843, he married Amanda Prons at Ann Arbor, Mich. In young manhood he entered the Norwalk Academy where he was soon after converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church and became a minister of the Gospel. He was an earnest and successful Methodist preacher. He joined the Michigan Conference in 1838 and was for a number of years a missionary among the Indians in the bounds of his conference. He entered the Central Illinois Conference in 1857.

During the war of the Rebellion he was elected chaplain of the 86th Illinois Infantry and did service in the Union army until failing health compelled his resignation. His health was never fully restored and about nine years ago he was afflicted by a stroke of paralysis which rendered his left side helpless. His brain and voice were affected to such an extent that at times he could not converse freely nor intelligently.

Nearly five years since his wife died and he was left practically alone. On the 24th of July, 1893, at his home in Abingdon, Ill., his weary spirit was liberated, returning to God who gave it and we laid his body beside that of his departed wife in the Abingdon cemetery.

His school mate and life long friend, Dr. Richard Haney, preached an appropriate sermon on the occasion and other ministerial brethren assisted in the services.

At the re-union of his old regiment, (86th Illinois Infantry,) August 30, 1893, at Peoria, Ill., resolutions were adopted expressing sorrow on account of the death of the beloved chaplain, Rev. Geo. W. Brown. The resolutions declared that his comrades "found in him everywhere and always the true Christian gentleman, standing four-square to every wind that blew, devoting himself to the care and relief of the sick and wounded in the service of his country in the war of the Rebellion and in peace, bearing himself dignified, genial and unsullied as a gentleman, patriot and Christian."

ELLA R. METCALF.

Ella L. Robinson, daughter of W. L. and Catherine Robinson, was born at Brimfield, Ill., March 25, 1855, and died the 24th day of December, 1892, in the 38th year of her age. Her early life was spent near the

city of Geneseo, where she grew to womanhood, became a teacher in the public schools, and where on the 17th day of October, 1878, she united in marriage with Rev. Henry K. Metcalf, a member of the Central Illinois Conference.

She was educated at Hedding College, Abingdon, Ill., entering upon her studies in 1873 and concluding them in 1877. She took front rank among the students, completing her studies with great credit to herself and the college, and going forth well equipped for Christian work upon an exalted plane. After teaching one year in the schools of Henry county she became the companion and helpmate of Brother Metcalf, going with her husband to Victoria charge in 1878, remaining two years, thence to Whitefield in 1880, thence to Bardolph in 1881, thence to Cleveland and Colona in 1882, thence to New Boston in 1883, remaining two years, thence to Elvaston and Hamilton in 1885, thence to Dwight in 1886, and thence after two years to Elmwood where after four years of most efficient work for the Master, and a little more than fourteen years in the trials and triumphs, the joys and sorrows of itinerant life she went home to God.

Shall we search for the spring of this beautiful stream carrying music and life as it went on its course shining to the sea? Shall we look for the secret of this life; the elements of this character? The entire life of some persons is summed up in the toughness of their sinews, the strength of their nerves, the hardness and endurance of their muscles, and if you subtract from them these things the entire minuend is exhausted. If we are put in the form of equation, for example Goliath and his life, we would have Goliath of Gath, minus height, six cubits and a span, minus a coat of mail weighing 5000 shekels of brass, minus a staff like a weaver's beam, and minus a spear whose head weighed 600 shekels of iron—equals nothing. While many of nature's important works are wrought by infinite force moving at the dictate of infinite intelligence, and while many useful enterprises among men are accomplished by an aggregation of physical force of single individuals, our best work is not so effected. Sister Metcalf was the embodiment of physical frailty. Her method was that of the sunbeam, unattended and unheralded, falling upon the earth, penetrating the soil, finding the germ of life in the buried seed, warming it into activity, wooing it into foliage of wondrous design and petals of gorgeous hue and form, and filling the very air with a burden of exquisite perfume.

The shadow that many others cast in life must be measured by their commercial standing, by looking at the balance struck in the ledger of the counting house, and if you throw their life into an equation and subtract from that life lands, larder, liveried attendants, equipage, social standing, you will have zero for the result, and thus in the terse and powerful language of our Bishop alluding to the death of a certain noted eastern millionaire when they go into eternity they throw down millions behind them and have not one cent in front of them. The subject of this sketch, while with care, had enough of this world's goods to be comfortable and assist her in preparing for life's work, yet she had not a long golden lever with which to lift herself into conspicuous service. The lives of others seem to stand for length of days. A long life seemed a great consideration in Old Testament times and was regarded as a

special mark of Divine favor. The man who made his abode "in the secret place of the Most High" received the promise, "With long life will I satisfy him, and show him my salvation." And yet we are taught now to believe that—

"We live in deeds not years; in thoughts not breaths,
In feelings, not in figures on a dial.
We should count time by heart-throbs. He most lives
Who thinks most, feels the noblest, acts the best."

If you were to subtract from the record we have of Methuselah—969 years—the oldest man that ever trod the earth, how much would you have left? He lived eight times as long as Moses, fifteen times as long as Paul, and thirty times as long as Jesus, and yet the sacred writer sums the entire 969 years in nine lines. Sister Metcalf lived less than thirty-eight years and yet she accomplished very much more than many who have lived two or three times as long.

She was endowed with an excellent mind which she took great pains to carefully discipline, and with a sum of mental and spiritual qualities so sterling as to make her a real queenly soul.

Nor was it all in the peculiarly well-poised and attractive nature which she received through the laws of natural descent, nor in the well-directed and self-imposed course of mental discipline to which she subjected herself to which her character and life may be attributed. The grace of the Lord Jesus was greatly magnified in her. At the early age of ten years she gave her heart to God, and questioned her faith as little as she questioned gravitation, or space, or the seasons, or any of the immovable verities. The cardinal points of her creed were as settled as her personal identity or as the multiplication table. So true and real was the religion of the Christ to her that its opposite seemed unthinkable; as the vine about the oak she trained the tendrils of her faith around the cross and clung. This was the note on which her whole life was keyed, and the unquestioned truth of God, the statutes of the Most High became her song in the house of her pilgrimage. The Holy Scriptures were the inspiration of her deeds, and by the Book her life was planned.

She found in herself an immortal spirit bound for deathless destiny. To her those words of the familiar line—

"A charge to keep I have
A God to glorify,
A never dying soul to save
And fit it for the sky."

were a living every-day reality.

And she saw in every one she met, specially in every child, an angel or a demon. It was her aim in her home, in the Sunday-school, in the Junior League, and everywhere to bring out the angel nature and make it pure and spotless and worthy to walk with God through the groves of Paradise.

It may be seen in the great day that pain sanctified of God had much to do with perfecting and ennobling that character which to-day is so much admired by all who were privileged to know her. In early life she suffered greatly from inflammatory rheumatism which lingered with her throughout life's journey. And who shall say that God did not, by

the very pain she suffered, burnish her spirit till it shows so resplendently; and who shall say that for this chastened, sanctified suffering she shall not glow with richer, fuller effulgence in the bright beyond? It was with his head pillowed on a rock that Jacob saw the ladder on which the angels climbed to glory; in the furnace of fire the Hebrew children found a Celestial Companion and glorious freedom; in the midst of ravenous beasts Daniel found his God able to deliver; in the storm on Galilee the disciples found Jesus the master of raging waves and warring winds; in prison Paul had his most beautiful epistles inspired; and when a lonely exile on Patmos John saw the New Jerusalem, the walls of jasper, the streets of gold, the tree of life, the fountain of life, the river of life, the 144,000 sealed out of the ancient tribes, the innumerable company of saved Gentiles, the harpers standing on the sea of glass mingled with fire, and amid the roar of a booming sea he heard the earthward sweeping melody of the redeemed as they sang the song of Moses and the Lamb, and who shall say that her light affliction did not work for her a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory.

Her life full of pain was also full of the song—

"Then with my waking thoughts
Bright with thy praise,
Out of my stony griefs
Bethel I'll raise;
So by my woes to be
Nearer, my God, to thee,
Nearer to Thee!"

There are just two questions which we ask on the decease of a fellow-being, namely: how did he live? and, how did he die? We have already told you how Sister Metcalf lived and from that recital you have doubtless already accurately pictured to yourself how she died.

With her husband she was very anxious about a new church for our people in Elmwood, and when the enterprise of building the church was decided upon she threw all the energies of her ardent nature into it, perhaps overtaxing them, and when the ceremonies of the cornerstone laying were passed she sank, utterly exhausted, and never rose again. She was better, she was worse; now her friends hoped, and then they feared, and so went on the struggle until on Saturday afternoon, about two weeks after the new church had been formally dedicated to God, at the going down of the sun, just before the natal day of Jesus the King, lying on a couch with her husband near she ceased to breathe, and Myrle, Florence, Zella and Frank were motherless, our secretary was companionless and Nellie Metcalf was with God.

They tell us that

"Life is like the snow flake
Falling on a river—
Seen for a moment
And then lost forever,"

and that may be satisfactory to those who think that life is not worth living, and that death ends all, but as for me, when I think of what she was and what she did, how unselfishly she devoted herself to her husband and children, her church, her Sunday school class, her Junior League, how her brain sparkled with plans for greater usefulness, and how her heart ran out in love for the world farther than her personal

plans could hope to reach; as I think of the mind that thought and of the heart that loved I prefer to say:

“These shall resist the empire of decay
When time is o'er and worlds have passed away.
Cold in the dust the perished heart may lie
But that which warmed it once can never die.”

Blessed be God—we are more than conquerors through him that loved us. We lose our friends for a while, bury our dead out of our sight, and push on in the fight, but we shall see them again. Jesus came out of the sepulchre to die no more, carrying the keys of the country with Him, and because He lives we shall live also. May God save us through this hope till we shall hail them under the tree of life.

MRS. M. R. CUMMING.

Margaret Reid Maris, wife of J. S. Cumming, pastor of First Methodist Episcopal Church, Moline, Ill., peacefully closed a very beautiful and useful life at 4:20 Saturday afternoon, April 15th, 1893, aged nearly sixty-one.

She was born of Methodist parents in Cecil county, Maryland, a few miles from Baltimore. When she was a child the family moved to Washington, Ill., where she spent her girlhood days. She was married to J. S. Cumming, July 15, 1852, when they were both a little more than twenty years old. A few months later she went with her husband to their first appointment, Lafayette circuit, so that for forty years and two weeks she was subject to the varied experiences of life in the itinerancy.

She was the mother of eight children: Franc H., a member of Central Illinois Conference, Ada, who died in Oquawka, when fifteen months old, Belle Gilbert, who died in Monmouth, two years ago, Eddie, who died in Peoria, when a little less than five years of age, Eva, wife of H. W. Sisson, of Monmouth, Minette, wife of Fred Patterson, of Monmouth, and Gussie and Fannie who are still at home.

During most of her life she had almost perfect health, but for a few years her health failed, especially since the protracted sickness and death of her daughter Belle. Yet no one regarded her case as serious until about the middle of January, when she was taken sick and the doctor summoned. She so far recovered as to go, with the advice of her physician, to Monmouth, to visit with her daughters and friends, hoping that it would do her good. But she pined for her home in Moline, and grew worse until she was brought home, when for some time she seemed better, then worse, until at last “the weary wheels of life stood still,” and she ceased to suffer and entered into rest. At that holy hour her husband and daughters and daughter-in-law, Mrs. Franc H. Cumming, with the doctor and a few friends, in helpless grief, watched as she breathed out her precious life.

Her illness was attended with much suffering and great prostration so that very few beside the family were permitted to see her. All that the doctors and loving hands could do was done to relieve her from pain and win her back to life and health, but in vain.

Hers was a beautiful character. Her life was one of perfect purity. Her actions and words were all subject to the dictates of her enlightened conscience. So she seldom gave offence. In forty years she scarcely had an enemy. Young people especially confided in her.

She was deeply pious. At the age of eighteen she joined the church and devoted herself to the service of Christ. For years she was not satisfied with her religious experience, but with fasting and prayer, in the diligent discharge of duty she sought to know the joy of God's salvation. Twenty-three years ago she passed through a great spiritual struggle. Alone in the district parsonage in Onarga, with her babe in her arms, she waited far into the night, pleading for a clear and bright experience, until at length the Holy Spirit came so powerfully into her soul that sin and fear were expelled and perfect love reigned. This she related to her husband when he returned home a few days after and of it she spoke with glowing emotion three weeks before her death as she celebrated on her death bed what she called her spiritual birth. When she was sick at Monmouth in February, she said that she had always desired ecstasy when she came to die, but while she believed her sins forgiven for Christ's sake, she had no special joy. This troubled her. A few days after her return home her husband entered her room and found her in tears. In answer to his enquiries she said, "Oh my body is no better, but my soul is filled with rapture. It is all right now."

She was a life-long student and had a fair knowledge of many branches of science and of current events. Three years ago she completed the Chautauqua course and received her diploma. She was especially proficient in the knowledge of the holy scriptures. She read the Bible through many times, once upon her knees. Few had better knowledge of the word of God, but the best of all was that she had a knowledge of Christ as her personal Savior.

She was loving. She loved, and was loved by all. The sick and poor especially found her a helping friend, but in the home she excelled as loving wife and mother. Perhaps no mother ever loved her children more; none ever was more tenderly loved by them. In her last illness her daughters watched and anticipated her every wish, not leaving her a moment day or night.

She was zealous in the church, in the Sunday school, in the pastoral work. As a teacher she carefully and prayerfully prepared to teach. The members of her class were on her heart and in her prayers. When her husband was engaged in raising a heavy debt from Hedding College she went out and raised a thousand dollars. She was deeply interested in the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. A few weeks before its organization in Boston, Mass., she spent a few days with Dr. and Mrs. E. W. Parker, then just returned on a vacation from Moradabad, India, who were in fact founders of the society. From them she received large inspiration of Missionary zeal. Many years in Monmouth and elsewhere she gave this work her earnest prayers and hearty co-operation. She had just begun to meet with the sisters of Moline Auxiliary when sickness and death put an end to her loving labors.

She was a happy woman. She enjoyed the society of her family and friends. When informed that her husband had been appointed to Moline she was delighted because of the place, the friends and the fact

that the family might live at home, not being separated as had been the case for so much of the time during the last twenty-six years. She was pleased with the cordial reception by the people of the charge. But all this is passed. God has called her to her better home in heaven.

From the beginning of her illness she was impressed with the thought that it would be fatal. When her husband left her at Monmouth to return to Moline to make arrangements for the Sabbath, promising to return as soon as possible, she said, "Yes, you have often gone and come again, but that is all passed now." She often said, "Why does not the Master come and take me to Himself?" Her daughter, Mrs. Gilbert, when dying said, "Ma, won't you look after my boys?" From that moment she felt that the boys were her special charge. When dying she spoke tenderly of Fred and Harry and said that she hoped that they and the rest would so live that she might

"—— ——— find them all again,
In that eternal day."

The day she died she said to her little grandson, "Harry, I shall soon meet your mother in Heaven."

We have no doubt that she has entered into "the rest that remains to the people of God." Our hearts would fain draw aside the curtain and see her happy state, but we must wait until the Master dismisses us from toil. "Our hearts are bleeding," but we "calmly say, Thy will be done."

Jane Caroline Hall, wife of Rev. E. P. Hall, was born in Circleville, Ohio, October 3, 1837, moved to Illinois in 1854, graduated from Knox College in 1858. After teaching for some years in the state of Illinois she returned to Ohio on a visit and was there married to Rev. E. P. Hall on the 22d day of May, 1862.

They were transferred to the Central Illinois Conference in 1865.

She died Thursday morning, August 3, 1893, about 5 o'clock, aged 56 years.

When nearing the margin she reached out her hand, saying to her dear husband "Goodby." Then her last words upon earth were: "Tell Will to meet me in Heaven."

We can't be extravagant now. We may do our best now for we have a character in dear sister Hall that can stand the test. After we have said all the good things possible, all will say we might have said more. From youth all along down to the day of her death she has been gathering up the sunbeams and scattering seeds of kindness; when, about 5 o'clock on the morning of the 3d of August, God's passage boat to the spirit land weighed anchor and set sail with her redeemed soul on board for immortal glory.

In youth, I imagine, she was graceful and bright. The beauties of nature charmed her soul until it was filled with music. She was in harmony with the music of the spheres. The glory of the heavens encircled her brow. The dew of the morning fell in crystal beauty upon her new born life. The beauty of her God was upon her. Her satisfaction was to come with the awaking with His likeness. She moved along

the path of youth with her soul panting for the living God.

She entered girlhood with an intense thirst for knowledge and with the ability to acquire it. Her mind entered into the educational arena to achieve whatever victory there was to gain. She entered Knox College and graduated with much credit to herself, receiving her diploma as a testimonial of her success.

Her mind was well stored with useful knowledge. She went to work with her talents, for I assure you she had all of five, and such as she had were sufficient to make her a good and faithful servant of Jesus, for she worked them to their full capacity. Fully equipped she entered the vineyard of the Master as the wife of an itinerant Methodist preacher. She went with him from charge to charge, and from the banks of the turbid waters of the Mississippi, all along through these prairies, she assisted in turning the desert into a garden. Her songs cheered on in the thickest of the battle. Her prayers were at the mercy seat, where Jesus answers prayer. Her testimonies were a bugle blast to lead on the feeble and fainting. Her missionary talks set forth the heathen as an inheritance for her master, and the uttermost parts of the earth as his possession. In the temperance work she buckled on her armor, and her motto was: No quarter to this, the most wicked of human foes. When she was smiting the traffic, hip and joint, she would reach down, with a Christian sympathy, to lift up the most unfortunate victim of the traffic.

She moved along the line of Divine agencies for the good and help of humanity.

We present her life as among the best unfolding of superior womanhood, under the economy of Divine grace. Grace polished her and grace has led her home. She has filled all her stations in life well.

As a wife she was loving, devoted, attentive, and full of consideration for every care and interest of her manly Christian husband. Taking the place of a mother she was affectionate, tender and kind, full of effort to lead those in the right way who had come under her care.

As a sister she was watchful and gentle. Her eyes knew where to rest and her hands were moved where the touch was needed. Words of gentleness and good cheer fell from her lips like the distilled dew. She walked in the path of the just and beckoned on others of the family toward the celestial city.

As a neighbor she had everybody in her heart. The brotherhood and sisterhood of the human race were the themes which thrilled her soul and caused her to try to do good wherever the opportunity offered. Her kindness knew no bound, her sympathy was commensurate with the suffering of the race.

As a friend she never wavered. She would take even the secrets of your heart and handle them as she would her own. She would take all of your words and touch them with a golden fringe. She would take all your actions, and if possible, mould them into good deeds.

In all my experience I never had a better and truer friend. Her great heart took me in and she would have sheltered me from any storm. We would like to have a life picture to hang up in our home that we might write under it and all around it, *Friend*.

As a Christian she was complete in Christ Jesus. God had opened unto her and showed her the fullness of His salvation.

We connect this beautiful life with the beatific saying of Jesus—Matthew v.-8: "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God."

It is good to dwell amid the beatitudes. They charm the soul into quietness. They quiet the surging sea. They chain the furious lightning and hush the muttering thunder. They are the jewels of God's revelation.

FIRST DAY.

LEWISTOWN, ILLINOIS, SEPTEMBER 19, 1894.

Thirty-Ninth Session.—The Central Illinois Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church met for its thirty-ninth session in the M. E. Church, Lewistown, Illinois, September 19, 1894, at 8:30 A. M.

In the absence of the Bishop, M. V. Crumbaker, Presiding Elder of the Macomb District, called the Conference to order, and with the assistance of the other Presiding Elders, administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

Organization.—On motion of G. J. Luckey, the Secretary of the last Conference was instructed to cast the ballot of the Conference for J. S. Cumming as temporary President.

J. S. Cumming took the chair and called upon the Secretary of the last Conference to call the roll, and 147 members and probationers answered to their names.

M. V. Crumbaker nominated H. K. Metcalf as Secretary and he was re-elected by show of hands.

H. D. Clark was nominated as Treasurer by B. F. Tallman, and he was re-elected by show of hands.

J. D. Calhoun was nominated as Statistical Secretary by Thomas Doney, and he was re-elected by show of hands.

On motion of C. O. McCulloch, the Secretaries and Treasurer were authorized to nominate their assistants.

The Secretary nominated D. S. McCown and J. F. Robinson as his assistants, and they were re-elected.

The Treasurer nominated D. F. Wilson, O. T. Dwinell, and J. H. Ryan as his assistants, and they were elected.

The Statistical Secretary nominated B. F. Eckley, C. L. Davenport, G. D. Hensell, I. Willett Puffer, T. A. Beall, and W. F. Jameson, and they were elected his assistants.

Reporters.—On motion of A. K. Tullis, N. T. Allen was appointed Reporter for the local press, and granted the privilege of selecting his own assistant. On motion of J. P. Forsyth, D. A. Perrin was appointed to report to the Northwestern Christian Advocate.

Bar.—On motion of M. A. Head the bar of the Conference was fixed on a line with the rear of the second windows back of the transepts.

Conference Hours.—On motion of A. K. Tullis, the time for opening the Conference sessions was fixed at 8:30 A. M., the first half hour to be given to devotional exercises, and the time of adjournment at 11:45 A. M.

One Per Cent. Assessment.—B. E. Kaufman moved that the one per cent. assessment be paid to the treasurer of the Conference Claimants' Society. B. F. Tallman moved as a substitute that the whole subject of the one per cent. assessment be referred to a committee of five and that the money be retained by the preachers until the question be settled.

On motion of G. R. Palmer the previous question was ordered.

The substitute prevailed and the following committee was appointed by the Chair: H. D. Clark, B. E. Kaufman, E. Wasmuth, Joe Bell, R. G. Pearce.

Domestic Missions.—On motion of M. A. Head it was ordered that a column be placed in the minutes for Domestic Missions.

The Thirteenth Question:—"Was the Character of each Preacher Examined?" was taken up.

Galesburg and Rock Island Districts were called. The characters of G. J. Luckey and M. A. Head were passed and they reported their districts.

Bishop Merrill arrived and announced on taking the chair that he was here at the request of Bishop Mallalieu, who is detained by illness.

On motion of D. A. Perrin it was ordered that the Pastors report the amounts of Missionary and Conference Claimants collections and whether all the Collections, including Domestic Missions, were taken.

The character of B. F. Tallman was passed and he reported the Kankakee District.

The character of M. V. Crumbaker was passed and he reported the Macomb District.

Gospel In All Lands.—J. N. Fawcett was appointed agent for the Gospel in all Lands.

FOURTH DAY.

MORNING SESSION.

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 22, 1894.

At 9 o'clock Bishop Mallalien took the chair.

The Journal of yesterday's session was read and approved.

The resolution was adopted by a count vote of 94 to 50.

Excused.—On motion of G. J. Luekey, E. H. Alford was excused to attend a funeral.

Book Concern.—At the request of Dr. Curtis, of Chicago, M. A. Head addressed the Conference in the interest of the Western Book Concern.

Bishop Mallalien followed with remarks on the publications of the Book Concern and especially the Hymnal, and the Conference demonstrated its familiarity with that volume by answering some questions and by singing in grand chorus the old hymn beginning, "Oh! How Happy are They who their Saviour Obey."

The One Per Cent. Assessment.—The special committee to which had been referred the matter of the one per cent assessment, presented its report, which was adopted. (See Report.)

Forward Movement.—The special committee on the Forward Movement, presented its report. After an address by G. W. Gray, on motion of M. A. Head the report was adopted. (See Report.)

Introduced.—The following brethren were introduced to the Conference: H. L., H. M., and D. L. Bowen, of the Protestant Methodist Church; J. A. Smith, of the Colorado Conference; G. M. Boswell, of the Black Hills Mission Conference; Darley R. Collings, of North Nebraska Conference; and Dr. C. L. Mann, of the Alabama Conference.

Daniel Ayers.—On the renewal of the motion of M. A. Head, the relation of Daniel Ayers was changed from supernumerary to superannuated, and he was recommended to the Board of Stewards as a claimant on this year's funds.

The Eleventh Question:—"What others have been elected and Ordained Deacons?" was taken up.

Vincent Aten was called forward and Bishop Mallalieu, after some remarks of a personal character, administered reproof in accordance with the findings of the Select Number.

On motion of G. R. Palmer the character of Vincent Aten was passed.

Memorial Session.—It was voted that when we adjourn, we adjourn to meet this afternoon at 2:30 for Memorial Session.

Richard Haney was appointed to preside at the Memorial Session.

On motion the Conference adjourned.

The Doxology was sung and Dr. Hunter pronounced the Benediction.

On motion of D. A. Perrin, the memoir of Mrs. G. M. Webber was ordered printed in the Minutes.

Richard Haney read the memoir of Amos Morey and added some remarks concerning the life of the deceased.

The memoir of E. P. Hall was read by M. V. B. White, who also spoke of Brother Hall's last illness and death.

On motion of F. R. Boggess, M. V. B. White was requested to write a letter of condolence to the daughters of Brother Hall.

J. S. Cumming and M. V. B. White made appropriate remarks concerning the life and works of Mrs. G. M. Webber.

On motion of J. W. Denning the Secretary was requested to write a letter of condolence to the daughter of A. C. Price.

On motion of M. F. Havermale the Conference adjourned.

After an appropriate selection was sung the Benediction was pronounced by G. I. Bailey.

The Bishop being delayed, G. R. Palmer, by appointment of the Bishop, took the chair at 9 o'clock.

The Minutes of Saturday morning and afternoon sessions were read and approved.

Memoirs.—M. A. Head moved that the memoir of Mrs. Mary Holmes be inserted in the Minutes.

C. O. McCulloch moved to lay this motion on the table, which prevailed by a count vote of 39 for and 26 against.

On motion of J. W. Haney the Conference requested that the memoir of Mrs. Mary Holmes be published in the Daily Advocate.

Sale of Property.—On motion of M. V. Crumbaker the Conference granted to the Ellisville Church the privilege of using money realized from the sale of the old church for parsonage purposes.

On motion of J. W. Haney the Conference granted to the Washburn charge the privilege to sell the Phelps Chapel property and apply the money in paying for a parsonage at Washburn.

Excused.—G. C. Shaffer, E. S. Wilson and S. E. Steele were excused from further attendance on the Conference.

The Bishop came in and took the chair.

Order of the Day.—On motion of J. S. Cumming, the voting on the Constitutional Questions was made the Order of the Day for 10 o'clock this A. M.

Wesley Hospital.—On motion of B. F. Eckley, the action of the Conference ordering a column set aside for reports of collections for Wesley Hospital was rescinded.

Appeals.—G. J. Luckey presented a paper concerning appeals from the Hampton and Colona charges and offered a resolution containing a memorial to the next General Conference, which was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

The Secretary read the First Proposition. The result of the vote on this Proposition was by count vote, 53 for and 92 against.

The Secretary read the First Form of the Second Proposition, and a count vote resulted in 129 for and 16 against.

The Secretary read the Second Form of the Second Proposition, and a count vote resulted in 133 for and 8 against.

The Third Proposition was read and adopted by a count vote of 151 for and none against.

Papers relating to Constitutional changes were received from other Conferences and on motion of B. F. Tallman, were referred to a special committee, consisting of J. S. Cumming, F. W. Merrill, C. O. McCulloch, R. G. Pearce, M. A. Head, with instructions to report next year.

B. E. Kaufman moved that when we adjourn we adjourn to meet at 7:30 P. M. M. V. B. White moved to amend by substituting 2:30 for 7:30. The amendment prevailed and the motion as amended was carried.

W. H. Hitchcock arose to a question of privilege, and after representing his case, requested a change of relation from effective to supernumerary.

R. G. Pearce moved that his request be granted. W. H. Hunter moved as a substitute that his case be referred to the Committee on Con-

ference Relations. The motion to substitute was carried and the substitute prevailed.

Committees were called and announcements made. J. S. Cumming was appointed to preside at the afternoon session, and Alexander Smith to lead the devotional exercises.

The Doxology was sung and B. C. Dennis pronounced the Benediction.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH EXTENSION.

To the Central Illinois Conference:

The Board of Church Extension of the Methodist Episcopal Church makes general statement of the work of twenty-eight years.

The organization of this work, though directed by the General Conference of 1864, was not completed until the latter part of 1865, and the work really began in 1866.

From 1866 to September 1st, 1894, the Board had collected and disbursed in round numbers, (the exact figures change daily,) . . . \$5,128,000

Of this, the General Fund, derived chiefly from collections, but including also special gifts for Frontier Churches, \$250 each, and Mountain Fund specials of \$100 each, for use by donations to churches has attained \$3,302,000

The Loan Fund contains a permanent capital of \$903,000

The churches borrowing from it have returned 923,000

Giving for use of loans \$1,826,000

Making the aggregate above given \$5,128,000

With this the Board has aided 9,401 Churches—more than one-third of the entire number owned by our Church.

Our Conference has shared in this work as follows:

The collections taken in our Churches from the beginning of the last fiscal year of the Board have aggregated . . . \$ 42,771 77

Those reported to the Board in Philadelphia from November 1st, 1893, to date, are 274 00

Cash received by Conference Treasurer, (do not include vouchers in last item) 2,145 00

Making a total of \$ 45,190 77

Churches within our bounds have received aid up to November 1st, 1893, the close of the last Church Extension year to the number of seventy.

By donations of \$ 15,114 15

And loans of 7,350 00

It is manifest that the value and efficiency of the Loan Fund depend upon the fidelity and promptness of Churches borrowing from it, in meeting their obligations. To fail in this is a most serious fault, which the Board in Philadelphia, as the custodians of the fund, should not, under any circumstances permit. We urge our Churches to meet every obligation with the strictest fidelity.

“Christianity In Earnest,” being issued every two months, gives fresh and valuable information concerning Church Extension, and suggestive discussions of this and kindred subjects. It is a great help to the pastors, and a larger circulation among our people, especially our official members, would promote the interest of the cause.

“Glad Tidings,” with its service of song and condensed information, is pre-eminently adapted for a Church Extension service in every Church and Sunday school. We cordially recommend its use in taking the Annual Collections.

Church Architecture has been greatly improved under the auspices of the Board, and we earnestly advise all who contemplate building to avail themselves of the facilities which the Board has to offer.

In organizing new Churches and in taking titles to Church property there should be great care to conform to the laws of the State and the Discipline of the church. The necessary information is now accessible to all in the new book, “The Religion of the Republic,” by Dr. A. J. Kynett, published by our Western Book Concern. This and the necessary blank forms for incorporation of Churches, title deeds, etc., can be obtained at our Western Book Depositories.

We recommend for adoption the following resolutions:

1. We congratulate the Church upon the great work accomplished by our Board of Church Extension, and commend it to the enlarged liberality of all our people.

2. The fact that our country is new, that our population doubles in less than thirty years, so that within another quarter of a century we shall exceed a hundred millions of people, and that the powers of evil are intensely active, demand that the work of Church Extension shall immediately be greatly enlarged and more than doubled in the quarter of a century to come.

3. We will not be content until, in the enlargement of this work under the direction of the General Committee and the Board of Church Extension, we shall fully perform the part assigned us as a Conference.

4. In order to do this we will, in our several appointments, avail ourselves of the helps provided by the Board, in “Christianity in Earnest” and “Glad Tidings,” and will endeavor to lead all our Churches to respond in full to the call made upon them in pursuance of the plans of the Discipline.

We are sorry to announce a decrease of \$106 below last year.

That a permanent Committee, consisting of one from each District, be appointed to co-operate with the book agents in collecting accounts, and that Committee be the Standing Committee on Book Accounts and Periodicals.

That we request the General Book Committee to take such further action as may be practicable for the protection of the Book Concern dividends. G. R. PALMER, *Chairman*.

EDUCATION.

The Committee on Education respectfully submits the following report:

HEDDING COLLEGE.

We greatly rejoice in the marked prosperity of Hedding College under the efficient leadership of Dr. J. G. Evans, and the excellent efforts of his co-laborers. Despite the hard times, the past year has been in many respects, the best in its history, and the present year gives rich promise of larger increase in attendance and effective work.

The purchase of the Normal School building in the south part of the city is a wise move, giving us possession of a valuable property, and furnishing the special departments with splendid facilities for successful effort and development, while it obviates the embarrassment of a competing school, and unites the entire city in the interest of Hedding College.

We commend this college for the good discipline and splendid religious tone continually prevailing.

The absence of secret fraternities and outside match games in athletic sports, makes discipline easy, and class wars and hazing unknown at Hedding.

We heartily commend this College to the patronage of all who desire a safe, successful, spiritual school, in which to pursue the higher education.

We recommend the hearty co-operation of the Conference in all efforts at creating endowment, and in accordance with the recommendations of the Board of Trustees and Conference Visitors, we present the following for appointment:

President, J. G. Evans, D. D., LL. D; Professors V. C. Randolph, A. M., B. D., and A. A. Waters, A. M., B. D.

Trustees for three years: J. W. Haney, T. J. Wood, J. D. Smith, Wm. Woolley, S. T. Mosser, C. C. Merrill, R. G. Gardner and Joshua Walker.

To fill the vacancy caused by the death of Dr. Madison Reece, Samuel Odell.

We also recommend for Conference Visitors: J. A. Northrup, R. G. Pearce, H. K. Metcalf, A. P. Beall, R. Barton, C. T. Cady and Alexander Smith.

GRAND PRAIRIE SEMINARY.

The Conference Seminary shows many signs of healthy growth.

1. *In Organization.* Its departments are better equipped and developed than ever before. There is a four years' course in Classics, Sciences and Advanced English Branches. The College Preparatory Course meets all the conditions required for preparation for entering college and university life, and has been highly commended by our leading Methodist institutions. The Normal, Commercial, Musical, Art and Elocutionary departments are well provided for, and successfully carried on.

2. *In Its Teaching Force.* It has eleven teachers, nearly all of whom are graduates of leading schools, and whose salaries are above the average paid in similar institutions.

3. *In Attendance.* The present registration is one hundred and ninety, being the largest of any fall term in the history of the school. All but twenty-five of these are in the literary departments.

4. *In Material Resources.* There are three buildings in excellent condition. Gifts amounting to \$5,000 have been received during the year, bringing up the total bequests and improvements of recent years to about \$32,000, besides unsettled claims to fully as much more. Extensive improvements have been made. The old Recitation Building has been painted and papered throughout. One of the Trustees has donated the lot, and two others of the Board have agreed to put upon said lot a well-equipped gymnasium building forty by sixty feet. This gift is already fully assured, and will be of great benefit to the School.

We give our best encouragement to the efforts being made to increase the endowment of the Seminary, and our thanks to the Trustees for their energy in planning for and pushing the work of additional buildings, as well as for their generous gifts to the School.

We recommend the School to the patronage of our people, feeling that Grand Prairie Seminary is entitled to our loyal support.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. S. Van Pelt, D. D., as President. Also, that John Rogers, R. B. Williams, L. F. Cullom, J. E. Mercer, J. Wilkinson, H. D. Clark and R. H. Figgins be appointed as Conference Visitors.

ILLINOIS WESLEYAN UNIVERSITY.

The University is enjoying a degree of prosperity which is indeed very gratifying.

The catalogue of last year shows a total enrollment in the departments of Letters, Music, Art and Law of fourteen hundred and thirty-four. The opening of the present year is the best in the history of the institution.

The income from tuitions and endowment for the past year was \$1,200 in excess of current expenses. The Executive Committee purchased and fitted up a Gymnasium, applying \$3,000, leaving a balance of \$1,800, which will be provided for. Judge O. T. Reeves, President of the Board of Trustees and Visitors, who has been connected with the Board since 1854, says: "At no time in the history of the institution have the finances been in better condition."

The Faculty remains as it was. Professor Heidel was granted a year to pursue a post-graduate course in his special department. Wilber Ferguson, A. M., Professor of Greek in Adrian College, Michigan, fills his chair in the meantime. President Wilder is deservedly popular and is securing large additions to the productive endowment.

The Non-Resident and Post-Graduate department, under the able management of Professor R. O. Graham, Ph. D., is far-reaching in its results. Students from various parts of the world are pursuing courses of study. Thirty-six degrees were conferred at the close of the last year.

Marked improvements have been made in the efficiency and management of the Preparatory School, by Professor Green.

We recommend the election of Col. D. C. Smith, of Normal; Dr. Samuel Van Pelt, of Onarga; Judge O. T. Reeves and J. B. Ayers, as Trustees for the ensuing term.

We recommend as Visitors: J. S. Cumming, R. Crewes, J. W. Frizzelle, T. Doney, M. V. Crumbaker, T. W. McVety.

SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY, DE PAUW UNIVERSITY.

This Theological School for young men preparing for the Christian ministry, has had a prosperous year, with an enrollment of seventy-nine.

We heartily commend it for the thorough and practical work done.

NORTHWESTERN UNIVERSITY.

It is with pleasure that we report the continued prosperity of this, the greatest of our Western Institutions of Learning. The enrollment of students has been very large. The endowment is constantly increasing, and every department is seeking for the most modern and best appliances.

The corps of professors has been enlarged, and in ability, stands by the side of the great tutors and professors of European universities.

The wise and judicious administration of President Henry Wade Rogers, is a factor that cannot be omitted.

We recommend that Rev. F. W. Merrell be continued as Conference Trustee for the ensuing term.

GARRETT BIBLICAL INSTITUTE.

One hundred and forty-four students have been in attendance at Garrett Biblical Institute during the past year. More and better work is being done by this School than ever before.

Two courses of study are offered. The degree course is especially arranged for students who have completed the Classical course in an approved College. The Diploma Course is designed to furnish a comprehensive curriculum of theological study for persons who have not the requisite qualifications for the Degree Course.

We commend this School to all our young men who desire a thorough theological training.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. J. W. Edwards and Rev. M. M. McCreight as Visitors.

Resolved, That the collections for Education, other than the Children's Fund, be retained for distribution among the three Conference Schools.

Resolved, That the distribution of said funds for the ensuing year shall be as follows:

The collections taken in the Churches, North and East of the following line, shall go to Grand Prairie Seminary, viz: Beginning at Seneca and following the railroad from Seneca to Gardner, from Gardner to Pontiac, and from Pontiac to Gibson City. The collections from the balance of the Conference shall be divided between Hedding College and the Illinois Wesleyan University upon the basis of the number of licensed preachers coming from within the bounds of this Conference, said licentiates to be certified by name and residence to the Conference Treasurer, who shall apportion said funds, and said money shall be used for the payment of current expenses.

We call attention to the fact that the collection taken for the Children's Fund cannot be divided and a part of it given to the Conference work.

The Discipline requires the taking of the two collections, and while the collection for the Children's Fund may be forwarded to New York, the Educational Collection should be paid to the Conference Treasurer.

Resolved, That we request the Pastors not to take the two Educational Collections on the same day.

We are gratified to learn that the Board of Education has aided over 1,500 students the last school year, and that thirty-three of these belonged within the bounds of our own Conference, who received aid to the amount of \$1,700.25. Inasmuch as this is a much larger sum than this Conference contributed to the Board last year, we urge the faithful observance of Children's Day, and an earnest effort to increase the Children's Day collections, and the sending of these collections as the Discipline requires. We recommend the use of the programmes prepared by the Board of Education.

EPISCOPAL FUND.

Your Committee on the Episcopal Fund beg leave to report as follows:

We are pleased to report that the receipts last year from all the Annual Conferences exceed the total expenses by \$8,891.07. But we are

sorry that of the \$2,054 apportioned to our Conference, we have raised only \$1,463, or 70 per cent of the full amount, while the total pastor's salary paid is 97 per cent. of the apportionment.

Many of our charges, some of them of the first grade, have failed in spite of last year's resolutions, to carry out the Disciplinary rule to see that the Bishops share pro rata with the Presiding Elder and Pastor.

That this end may be secured in the future we recommend that the Presiding Elders at the First and Fourth Quarterly Conferences insist that the pro rata division be made. And furthermore, we recommend that each pastor in his report to the Annual Conference, be required to state whether the division has been made.

In regard to the \$2,084 apportioned to this Conference for General Conference expenses, which was referred to this committee, we would recommend that it be apportioned to the charges proportionately to the Bishop's claim.

EPWORTH LEAGUE.

The Church is to be congratulated on the Christian activity of our young people, as shown in the increasing prosperity of the Epworth League. The statistical report will show that we now have 236 Leagues, with 10,512 members, and 117 Junior Leagues, with 4,900 members. A gain, during the year, of 31 Adult Leagues, and 969 members, and of 35 Junior Leagues, and 2,063 members. We believe that this great awakening among the young that has resulted in their almost universal organization among us into societies for definite Christian work, betokens the dawn of a brighter day for the cause of Christ. The wise pastor here has an opportunity to direct the efforts of his young people along all lines, literary, social, churchly and religious. We urge the formation in all our Leagues of reading circles that may use the League reading course, or some other that may be selected. Particularly do we insist that our Leagues be instructed in the doctrines, polity and history of our beloved Methodism.

The unparalleled journalistic success of the "Epworth Herald" is the best indication of the place it holds in the esteem of our people, and of its value as a young people's organ. No home among us where there are young people can afford to be without it.

We urge the importance of massing our strength in a State Convention this year that shall properly represent this great body of Leaguers in the State of Illinois, and that if there be no State Convention, the officers of the Conference organization we request to arrange for a Conference Convention the last of June.

In view of the importance of the League as having committed to it so largely the interests of the church of the future, we request the Committee on Public Worship at the next Annual Conference to provide for the holding of the anniversary in the evening.

We would further reaffirm the action of the Conference last year in recommending:

1. That the Leagues within the bounds of the Conference be the local correspondents with our Conference Schools and that it be the specific effort to keep all Leagues in touch with these schools.

2. That the Quarterly Conference be requested to appoint an Educational Committee from the officers and members of the Leagues.

3. That the Leagues be authorized and invited to co-operate in the work of increasing the regular Educational Collection of the Church.

FREEDMEN'S AID AND SOUTHERN EDUCATION SOCIETY.

We recognize with feelings of gratitude the efficient work done by the Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society in the education and Christian training of the illiterate population of the Southern States.

The perpetuity of our free institutions demands the enlightenment of every citizen within our borders.

The appalling fact that there are more than a million and a half of white, and more than three millions of colored people in the South who cannot write, and that these millions are in the main dependent upon the schools of this Society for Christian education calls for greater diligence on the part of every loyal Methodist.

As a Conference we condemn that race prejudice and mob violence which is unreasonable, unjust, debarring the colored man from the full enjoyment of all the privileges guaranteed to him under the Constitution of the United States and the higher laws of God.

Believing that a more thorough dissemination of intelligence among our people with reference to the needs of the South, the purposes and practical workings of the Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society would result in largely increased collections, we therefore recommend that the pastors seek to more thoroughly acquaint themselves with the facts and give them to the people. As a means to this end, we recommend to all our brethren the "Christian Educator" as a magazine worthy of a place on every pastor's table.

Since the fruits of the Society's work are appearing in a constantly growing number of efficient teachers and preachers from among the Freedmen themselves,

Resolved, 1. That we will freely co-operate with the officers of this Society in their great work in the South.

2. That we will use all rightful means to raise the full amount, \$4,300, which has been apportioned to the Central Illinois Conference.

WHEREAS, The Word of God declares the Sabbath to be divinely appointed as a day of sacred rest and is necessitated by the demands of man's nature, and his moral and spiritual needs, and is to be observed, not as a holiday, but as a day of holy worship; for the very existence of our civil and religious institutions depends upon its perpetuation, therefore,

Resolved, 1st. That we will with renewed interest and zeal raise our voices in the pulpit and in private, against all the forms of its desecration, believing that all the highest and dearest interests of home, church and nation demand that we protect our Christian Sabbath from foreign invasion as well as home and social desecration. That we will by our influence and example solemnly and earnestly protest against the all too common sin of Sunday feasting and visiting, all amusements of every kind and all railroad travel or traffic upon that day, even if done to convey the multitudes to our camp grounds. We will endeavor to place the seal of condemnation upon all violations of God's laws on this sacred day.

Resolved, 2d. That in this age of loose morals and anarchistic and atheistic tendencies, we will as a Church prove true to our American Sabbath and preserve it unimpaired as a great defense to the nation and promotion of the glory of God.

 STATE OF THE CHURCH.

Your Committee on the State of the Church would respectfully submit the following report:

1. We are more than ever impressed with the fact of the adaptation of our episcopacy and itinerancy to the spread of the Gospel in all the world.

2. We rejoice that our Church has proved itself faithful to its mission, and historic record, in planting itself in almost every considerable community within our limits; yet there are neighborhoods where the

power of gospel truth has scarcely reached, and we would emphasize the importance of pushing forward into the outlying territory in many of our charges, and urge upon every pastor not only to visit the people in the remoter regions, but also to hold meetings as far as possible and preach the gospel to those who heretofore have not attended the means of grace, and to the better accomplishment of this work.

3. We deem it highly important to call the special attention of our people to the needs of our "Domestic Missionary Society," not only to aid the work in our important centers of population, but to make another "Forward movement" into the neglected rural districts.

4. Never, since the Reformation, was the sanctity of the Sabbath more imperiled than in these days of the turbulence of society, the rush of trains, the whirl of business, the greed of gain, the competition of corporations, the grasping of trusts, the unscrupulousness of politicians, and the consuming thirst for gratification and pleasure. It is high time for the Church to look with a jealous eye to all methods of running Camp Meetings, Chautauquas, and all enterprises of Church work so as to fully conserve the sacredness of the Lord's Day.

5. Observation shows that whenever the Apostolic outpouring of the Holy Spirit prevails, class meetings and prayer meetings abound, to refresh the people of God as in days of old; so we conclude that when these decline it is not an evidence of the advance methods of a higher culture, but a sure indication of a decadence of religious power, and the withdrawal of the Holy Spirit.

6. We are profoundly impressed with the danger to our beloved Zion in the frequent and much relied on practice of many of our societies, of resorting to frequent entertainments of various kinds to raise the money necessary to carry on the enterprises of the church. Shall we not be wise when we rely on the consecrated means of God's people, together with whatever the world at large may be pleased to devote to the cause, for building the walls of Zion? Shall not the glad day hasten when our people shall prove the Lord if he will not open to them the windows of Heaven and pour them out a blessing that there shall not be room enough to receive it? Nevertheless we deem religio-sociability to be an eminently Christ-like and Apostolic practice. Christ and his Church were confessedly poor, but the thousands were not fed in the wilderness at fifteen or twenty-five cents apiece.

7. The gratitude of our hearts cannot be too fully expressed to God for the good work of our Epworth Leagues and Sunday Schools, in co-operating to strengthen the Church, and bring sinners to repentance. We trust all our members will join the pastor in earnest prayer that the youth of our land may be so baptized with the Holy Ghost that a glorious tide of grace may lift us to the Highlands of Salvation.

8. As heretofore we express our regret that often the directions of the Discipline regarding certain popular amusements are disregarded, and we urge our pastors to examine all probationers on such matters as well as on religious practice and experience, before receiving them into the Church, and to impress upon all the membership the importance of regarding our Church vows upon all points of discipline, as well as religious practice and experience.

9. Our extensive revivals the past year have proved a great blessing to the Church. Thousands of souls have been converted, and passed from darkness to light, and from the power of Satan to God. Let the wave of salvation roll on. Let us remember the old landmarks. With all new methods, with all advanced thought and culture, and the increase of knowledge, let us remember that the "Word of God" and God's way of saving sinners by faith in the blood of the Lamb, the washing of regeneration and the renewing of the Holy Ghost liveth and abideth forever.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND TRACTS.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

1. With joyful hearts we greet our brethren and co-laborers in the great Sunday School Union and rejoice with you in the wonderful prosperity following as an effect of the earnest effort of those to whom this great and important work has been entrusted.

Through the efforts of the Sunday School Board, in the year now closing 633 new schools were organized, giving us a total of 28,856 schools, with 328,856 officers and teachers and 2,409,874 scholars.

Through the faithful work of this great Sunday school army 2,901 souls have been born into the kingdom of God within the bounds of our Conference.

2. We recommend care by the pastor and superintendent in the selection of men and women for teachers who are in earnest in their spiritual experience, intelligent in mind, apt to teach, and godly in their lives.

3. We further recommend that normal classes for the better training of teachers, as presented by the Sunday school department, be approved, and that such classes be organized wherever practical and registered in the office of the Sunday School Union.

4. We commend as the purest and best literature for use in our Sunday schools that published by the Methodist Book Concern, and advise great care that nothing impure or light be found in them.

5. We advise parents to require their children to study the lessons at home during the week and that teachers and scholars use the Bible, and not merely the lesson helps in the Sunday school class.

6. We call attention to the fact that a portion of the Catechism of our church is published in each lesson quarterly, and we recommend that it be studied in the school.

7. Inasmuch as the Sunday School Union has aided during the past year more than 3,000 schools of our church, and has no other resources except the contributions from the charges, and that it asks from the entire church the sum of \$50,000 as the smallest amount with which their work can be accomplished, the apportioned share of our Conference being \$788, we recommend that this be apportioned by the Presiding Elders pro rata among the charges and raised during the coming year.

8. Referring to the report of the year now closing we find that six charges have made no report whatever to this benevolence and many have raised so little that the average amount from each charge is only \$2.33. We therefore earnestly urge that this benevolence have its rightful place and proper attention the coming year.

TRACTS.

1. We commend attention to the tract as an evangelizing instrumentality on account of (1) its inexpensiveness; (2) its adaptation to the many needs; (3) its convenience; (4) its brevity. The Tract Society of our church affords a vast assortment of religious literature in convenient form, which is at the service of our pastors and tract committees, and advantage should be taken of the generous offer made by the Board, which is that a donation of tracts equal in value to one-half of the sum contributed to the cause by each charge will be given.

2. We are glad to call attention to the fact that our Tract Society is an efficient aid to the great missionary enterprise of our church, contributing yearly to the cause of missions from \$6,000 to \$7,000, by the aid of its mission presses and distribution of its literature; and we recommend that the amount asked of our Conference by the Board, be apportioned by the Presiding Elders among the different charges for the ensuing year and urge that the pastors labor diligently to raise the amount in each case.

3. We especially commend the tracts headed "One Hundred Questions and Answers" on the doctrines and polity of the M. E. Church, also "Scriptural References" on which our General Rules are based, as helpful in our probationers' classes.

G. Pearce, J. E. Mercer, E. Wasmuth, Wm. Crapp. Attorneys for the Church, R. A. Brown, Richard Crewes. Attorney for the Defense, Joe Bell.

The Chairman called the Select Number to order and R. G. Pearce offered prayer.

The roll was called and all the Select Number answered to their names. The case being duly called, before the trial was formally entered upon, R. Crewes, counsel for the Church, presented the following letter:

DEAR BROTHER:—If I ever did you a wrong it was unintentional and I am very sorry for it. S. E. STEELE.

This letter was accepted by the prosecution and the charges were withdrawn.

It was moved and seconded that Brother Edmondson be permitted to withdraw the charges and that the Select Number recommend the passage of S. E. Steele's character. Motion prevailed on call of the roll without a dissenting voice.

We further recommend that each Presiding Elder in apportioning the amount for Conference claimants in his district, make that apportionment among the different charges proportionate to the net salaries allowed the preachers in charge. Also that the Conference Board of Stewards be

asked to recommend to the Conference each year for its consideration, an amount which in their judgment should be paid for the ensuing year.

WESLEY HOSPITAL.

We rejoice in the beneficent work accomplished by Wesley Hospital during the past year. Three hundred patients have been treated at this institution, one hundred and eighty of whom were unable to pay anything for services rendered. Thus \$550 worth of work was done free of charge.

We are rejoiced that as a Church we are moving in this matter, and express our conviction that the \$600 pledged by our Conference for the endowment of two beds can be raised without entailing a material burden upon even the weakest of our charges, it requiring an average of but \$2.50 from each charge for the fulfillment of that pledge. We would re-affirm our action of last year touching the setting apart of a day to be observed in all our charges as Hospital Day, when the interests of this worthy cause can be adequately presented to the people. We recommend that Rev. M. A. Head and Mr. A. Dean be continued as Conference Trustees. We regret that Rev. Jos. Odgers has felt it necessary to resign his position as superintendent of the hospital, believing as we do, that he has peculiar fitness for that position.

PLAN OF EXAMINATIONS.

That we may raise the standard and increase the attainments of our ministry, and that we may at the same time be fair to members of our conference classes, and conserve the interests of the Church of Christ, we respectfully present the following plan of examinations:

1. We suggest that the greatest caution be exercised in the selection of men to serve upon examining committees.

Also that the Committee annually appointed to examine candidates for Admission on Trial be continued with the class, when practicable, throughout the entire four year's course.

2. That all Examinations shall occur at the seat of Conference on dates immediately preceding the annual session.

3. Committeemen shall prepare written topics, upon which the class shall submit written replies. Any member of the Committee

shall have the right to propound any question relating to the subject under examination.

4. That candidates shall be marked on a scale of 10, which shall be considered perfect; but no candidate shall be advanced whose standing falls below 7.

“Books to be read,” shall count equally with books to be studied in establishing a grade.

5. That the Sermon and Essay shall be forwarded, postage fully prepaid, to the chairman of the Committee, thirty (30) days before the date of annual Conference. These shall be marked on a grade of 10, and shall be reported to the Conference separately from the studies.

Propositions For Constitutional Changes.

1. ON EQUAL MINISTERIAL AND LAY REPRESENTATION. (Discipline, Appendix, ¶ 34.)

Resolved, That the General Conference hereby recommends the following proposition to the Annual Conferences to be held in 1894, to-wit: To amend Section 2, Paragraph 67, of the Discipline so that the section shall read as follows: “The General Conference shall not allow of more than one Ministerial Representative for every fourteen members of an Annual Conference; nor of a less number than one for every forty-five; *provided*, nevertheless, that when there shall be in any Annual Conference a fraction of two-thirds the number which shall be fixed for the ratio of representation, that such Annual Conference shall be entitled to an additional Delegate for such fraction; and, *provided*, also, that there shall be from each Annual Conference Lay Delegates equal in number to the Ministerial Delegates, who shall deliberate and vote with the Ministers as one body; and, *provided*, further, that no Conference shall be denied the privilege of one Ministerial and one Lay Delegate.”

2. ON CHANGE IN RATIO OF MINISTERIAL REPRESENTATION. (Discipline, Appendix, ¶ 35.)

(a) *Resolved*, That the General Conference submits the following proposition to the Annual Conference of 1894, to-wit: To amend line 4, Section 2, Paragraph 67, of the Discipline so as to read: “Not more than one for every forty-five nor less than one for every ninety.”

(b) *Alternative Proposition*, The South Carolina Annual Conference, regarding the above proposition as defective in form, duly submits the following alternative proposition, to-wit: To amend the first two clauses of Section 2, Paragraph 67, so that they shall read as follows: "The General Conference shall not allow of more than one Ministerial Representative for every forty-five members of an Annual Conference; nor of a less number than one for every ninety."

3. ON CHANGE IN THE TIME OF THE MEETING OF THE GENERAL CONFERENCE.—(Submitted by the West Wisconsin Annual Conference.)

Resolved, That the Bishops presiding in the several Annual Conferences during the year 1894 are hereby respectfully requested to submit to all the Annual Conferences the following proposition, namely: To amend Paragraph 63 of the Discipline of 1892 so that it shall read as follows, to-wit: "¶ 63. The General Conference shall meet on the first Wednesday of May, in the year of our Lord 1900, and thenceforward on the first Wednesday in May once in four years perpetually, at such hour and in such place in the United States as the General Conference may from time to time direct; but the General Superintendents, or a majority of them, by and with the advice of two-thirds of all the Annual Conferences, shall have power to call an extra session of the General Conference, to be constituted in the usual way. But if there shall be no General Superintendent, then two-thirds of all the Annual Conferences shall have power to call such extra session."

This certifies that the Central Illinois Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, at its session begun in Lewistown., Ill., on the 19th day of September, A. D., 1894, voted on the above propositions as follows:

MEMORIAL TO GENERAL CONFERENCE.

On the 23d day of June, 1894, in the fourth session of the Quarterly Conference for the Hampton charge, G. J. Luckey, the Presiding Elder

in the chair, P. Warner, the Pastor, nominated Mrs. Emma Arcularius, and Mrs. Emma Norton for election to the office of Trustees.

In view of the construction of the law by the General Conference that "the pronouns he, his and him, when used in the Discipline with reference to Stewards, Class Leaders, and Sunday School Superintendents, shall not be so construed as to exclude women from such offices," thereby implying that women are not eligible to such offices as do not come within the provisions of this construction; and, further, in view of the fact that, on the 14th day of September, 1891, Bishop I. W. Joyce, at that time presiding in this Conference, sustained the ruling of C. O. McCulloch, Presiding Elder of the Peoria District, in two cases of appeal from his decision that "women are not eligible to the office of Trustee in the Methodist Episcopal Church"; the Presiding Elder ruled the nomination out of order on the ground that women are not eligible to the office of Trustee in the Methodist Episcopal Church, from which ruling the Pastor, P. Warner, dissented and appealed from the said ruling to the President of the Annual Conference.

On the 3d day of September, 1894, in the fourth Quarterly Conference for the Colona charge, G. J. Luckey, the Presiding Elder, in the chair, J. A. Frazier nominated Mrs. A. C. Stevens, Mrs. A. B. Sale, and Mrs. O. A. Gilbert for election to the office of Trustees.

In view of the construction of the law by the General Conference, that "the pronouns, he, his and him, when used in the Discipline with reference to Stewards, Class Leaders, and Sunday School Superintendents, shall not be so construed as to exclude women from such offices," thereby implying that women are not eligible to such offices as do not come within the provisions of this construction; and further, in view of the fact that on the 14th day of September, 1891, Bishop I. W. Joyce, at that time presiding in this Conference, sustained the ruling of Rev. C. O. McCulloch, Presiding Elder of the Peoria District, in two cases of appeal from his decision that, "women are not eligible to the office of Trustee in the Methodist Episcopal Church"; the Presiding Elder ruled the nomination out of order, on the ground that women were not eligible to the office of Trustee in the Methodist Episcopal Church, from which ruling the Pastor, J. A. Frazier dissented, and appealed from the said ruling to the President of the Annual Conference.

WHEREAS, The question raised in these Appeals has been passed upon by Bishop Joyce in a judicial ruling; and,

WHEREAS, It is desirable and important that the question shall receive such adjudication by the highest judicial authority in the Church, as to prevent further embarrassment in administration: therefore,

Resolved, 1. That this Conference respectfully memorializes the General Conference to give such construction of the law as to finally settle the question of woman's eligibility to fill the office of Trustee in the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Resolved, 2. That this Conference requests the Delegates of this Conference to the General Conference to cause this memorial to be so presented to the General Conference as to secure such construction of the law.

Memoirs.

REV. ABEL C. PRICE.

Rev. Abel C. Price was born in Washington county, Pennsylvania, November 4, 1828, and died in Pittsburg, Pa., February 14, 1894.

When he was twelve years of age his father removed with his family to Fayette county and settled in the "Red Sandstone region," and here the son grew up to manhood.

His parents belonged to the Society of Friends, but the children were given perfect liberty in choosing their church relations.

While attending college at Meadville, Pa., he was soundly converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church. The new life that came into his soul at his conversion changed the whole after current of his life, and ever after, to know the will of God was at once to obey.

June 3, 1852, he was united in marriage to Miss Margaret Jameson, a young lady of rare worth, who for nearly forty years stood by his side, sharing with him in the toils, trials and victories incident to the life of the teacher and itinerant.

Nearly three years ago she passed from his side in holy triumph to the glories of the eternal world.

In 1856, Brother Price with his family moved to Putnam county, Illinois, where he expected to engage in farming, but for a time engaged in school teaching, in which profession he was regarded as eminently successful.

When the call of God and the church came to him to preach the gospel, he for a time hesitated, not from a shrinking from duty, but for a clearer revelation that it was the call of the Divine Spirit. But when that conviction was once reached, no man ever more loyally responded: "Here am I, send me," and no man ever more thoroughly consecrated himself to the office and work of the Christian ministry.

He was received on trial in the Peoria (now Central Illinois,) Conference at the session held in Peoria, September 10, 1856, and was ordained a Deacon by Bishop Ames at Bloomington in 1858, and an Elder by Bishop Baker, at Macomb in 1860.

For twenty-three years Brother Price did faithful and efficient work in the Central Illinois Conference, on the following charges: Mackinaw, Marshall, Hennepin, Monmouth, Toulon, La Prairie Centre, Chillicothe, Gardner, Vermont, Bushnell, Metamora, Eureka, Minonk and Lacon. On all these charges he left the impress of his master-hand.

During his first year at Lacon he was prostrated with inflammatory rheumatism, which compelled him to lay aside the active work of the pastorate, and in the fall of 1878 he was granted a superannuated relation. This brought him the needed rest, but it was not inactivity. For several years after he superannuated he represented the Bible Society in Marshall county, and he personally conducted a house to house visitation of the entire county.

He also did supply work for two or three years, where the labor required was light.

Brother Price was one of God's noblest and truest workmen. He was not what the world would call a brilliant man; yet he was a man of noble and inspiring quality of mind, and always inspired those with whom he came in contact with a high sense of Christian manliness.

He was a model workman. He planned like a general, and everything he did bore the impress of the most careful study and orderly arrangement. His preaching was plain, practical and impressive, and all who sat under his ministrations were instructed and edified.

He was not what would be called a revival preacher, but God honored his ministry in the salvation of many souls and the strengthening and upbuilding of the Church. This was especially so during his pastorate at Phelps Chapel, where the whole community was swept by the waves of Salvation and revival power.

In the department of Sunday School work he was a master, and he was always recognized as a leader among the Sunday School workers of the state. Leading in the advance of all Sunday School methods and appliances he studied to make this right arm of the Church effective, that he might magnify the word of God. He was three times honored by being elected a delegate to the National Sunday School Convention, and was also a delegate to the Robert Raikes World's International Sunday School Convention in London.

He also took a great interest in the Chautauqua Literary and Scientific Circle movement, and led many of the young people by this means to a higher intellectual and spiritual life.

In January, 1892, Brother Price suffered an attack of the grip, from which he never fully recovered. He left his former home in Lacon and went to live with his daughter in Pittsburg, thinking the change might be beneficial to his health. He seemed at times to be rallying, but his physical forces were gradually giving way. His last sickness began with a chill, and he seemed to realize that the time of his departure was at hand and made his plans accordingly. His only daughter, watching by his bedside, tenderly ministered to his every want. At last she saw the angels were loosening the bands that held the struggling spirit of her beloved father and was anxious to have one more testimony from his earthly lips, and bending over his wasted form she whispered,

“Father, how does the future look?” As quick as the lightning’s flash his face lit up with Heavenly brightness and divine triumph and he exclaimed, “O, Glorious!” His last words were addressed to his brother, and indicated his assurance of the victory in the final struggle.

On the 14th day of February, 1894, the redeemed spirit of our fellow worker, Abel C. Price, broke away from the environments of earth, and sweeping through the pearly gates of the Heavenly City, laid the trophies of his earthly life at the feet of our adorable Christ, and was crowned with glory, immortality and eternal life, and once more clasped hands with Chandler, Summers, Worthington, Haney, Morse and Millsap, and the host of others of his co-workers who are glorified with our own risen Lord and who hailed him with joy in that land where

“Eternal day excludes the night.
And pleasures banish pain.”

REV. EDWARD P. HALL.

Rev. Edward P. Hall was born in the state of Delaware, on August 21, 1824.

His parents moved to Ohio while he was young, where he was converted and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church in his youth. In 1849 he entered the Methodist itinerancy in the Ohio Conference, where he spent sixteen years of his early ministry in the hills of Ohio.

But thinking it better for his health he obtained a transfer to the Central Illinois Conference and came west in 1865 and subsequently filled the following appointments in the Central Illinois Conference: In 1865-6, pastor at Eureka; 1867, pastor at El Paso; 1868-9, pastor at Lexington; 1870-1, pastor at Onarga. From 1872 till 1875 he was Presiding Elder of the Normal district, serving there a full term. In 1876, pastor at Pontiac; in 1877, pastor at Dwight; 1878-79-80, pastor at Minonk; in 1881, pastor at Lewistown; in 1882 pastor at Elmwood.

At the session of the Conference held at Rock Island, Ill., September 26, 1883, he took a superannuated relation to the Conference and moved his family to the Normal District camp ground near Eureka, Ill., and subsequently filled the following appointments as supply, viz: 1885, Roanoke; 1886, Groveland and Morton; 1887-8, Deer Creek.

Thus Brother Hall showed his desire to work for the Master as long as he could, although he was partially blind and had other bodily infirmities that made it difficult for him to do the work of a pastor. He resided on the Eureka camp ground from 1883 to 1893.

His wife departed this life August 3, 1893, leaving him without a companion and breaking up his home. There seemed to be but one thing for him to do; that was for him to go to Plaquemine, La., and live with his married daughter, Mrs. McClure. So about October 1, 1893, he took leave of his many friends here and went south to make his home with his daughters, the single daughter being engaged in school teaching there. There with his children he ended his days on earth, closing a long and useful life on September 6, 1894.

He was always sanguine of success, consequently was not as cautious as many are, thinking he could see success where others saw defeat. This was especially true in his business transactions, being so hopeful of success that he often over-reached in making investments. However, all who had dealings with him regarded him as strictly an honest, conscientious Christian man, and the universal verdict is that Brother Hall would not have deviated from the line of justice and honesty for any consideration. Being sanguine in his mental make-up, he was always cheerful, genial and kind, and through all his disappointments, afflictions and bereavements, he thought the good Lord knew better than he did what was best for him.

He was twice married. Two daughters by his first wife survive him; none by his second wife. His domestic relations in both marriages were pleasant and happy, and his home was a model of love and affection. As a friend he was true and trustworthy, honest and open hearted, treating his friends always with consideration.

He was well educated and had a taste for reading and study, and he applied himself diligently to his studies and work. He thought for himself and preached his own sermons. He had a good and well selected library, of sufficient scope to give him broad views of the growing needs of the world. He was a true Methodist preacher, sound in doctrines according to the teachings of the church of his choice. He was faithful in all his pastoral work, loyal to the Discipline of his Church, both as presiding elder and pastor. He was well versed in the Scriptures and a thoroughly sound Gospel preacher, condemning the wrong and justifying the right in a fearless manner; still, sufficiently gentle, persuasive, and conservative to meet all the requirements of a Gospel of peace and good will to men.

He spent forty-five years in the ministry, thirty-four of which were spent in the effective ranks of the itinerancy and eleven in a superannuated relation to his Conference. During a part of this latter period he served as a supply, thus doing what he could to help on the work dear to him. He was highly esteemed and beloved by his brethren in the ministry and was honored with good appointments in the Central Illinois Conference. His religion was of a cheerful type, his experience clear and positive, and in his practice he was conscientious and zealous, fervent in spirit serving the Lord. He not only had salvation in his soul but he enjoyed it in his life. Not so perfect as to have no faults, but a perfect Christian with human infirmities.

He is not, for God has taken him to his reward. Doubtless he has heard the welcome in Heaven, "Well done, good and faithful servant."

He passed peacefully, and without a struggle from earth, to join the loved ones on the eternal shores of immortality.

AMOS MOREY.

Amos Morey was born in 1812 in the state of Maine. He came with his parents in 1831 and settled in Norwalk, Ohio, where he married Lydia Wright, at which place he led a class in Norwalk Seminary.

In 1837 he came to Illinois; in 1838 was licensed to preach. He was ordained Deacon by Bishop Morris in 1848, and was ordained Elder and joined the Rock River Conference held in Lewistown in 1854.

He filled the following appointments with credit to himself and profit and satisfaction to the people he served: Cuba, Fairview, La-Fayette, Abingdon, Ellison, Port Byron, Rock River, Pre-Emption, Millersburg, Smithfield, Avon.

His health failing he was granted a superannuated relation which he held to the time of his death.

He was a diligent student; his sermons were prepared with care. He always beat the oil before he lit the lamp.

His eldest son, Rev. George M. Morey, for years a member of this Conference, is now a member of the Nebraska Conference.

Our brother, now gone from us, was unassuming always, ever preferring others to himself, having the confidence and respect of all who knew him.

Thus lived, labored and died this man of God, whose record will appear on that day when God shall write up the history of those men and women whom he sent here in the first settlement of the great west, to lay the foundations of civil and religious liberty, and on which coming generations are to build till the end of time.

CORNELIA N. (VINCENT) WEBBER.

Cornelia N. (Vincent) Webber was born in Durhamville, N. Y., December 18, 1850, and died in Peoria, Ill., October 29, 1893, aged 42 years, 9 months and 11 days.

Her religious life began in her infancy. As far back as she could remember she loved and trusted Jesus. She enjoyed the privileges of a religious home and under these influences her spiritual life began, continued and fruited in a beautiful Christian character.

In the winter of 1867, during a revival meeting at La Prairie Center, Ill., she united with the M. E. Church, to which she gave much of her love and thought, and to the day of her death was abundant in labors, and always faithful to all the responsibilities upon her.

Some years ago, under a sermon preached by the late Rev. Dr. J. R. Jaques, at Oak Hill camp-meeting, she was led by the Holy Spirit to see that entire sanctification was the privilege of all God's children, and there she made a complete consecration of herself to God and by faith received cleansing and the baptism with the Holy Ghost. To this she gave a clear and joyful testimony in a meeting conducted by her pastor only four days before her death. This was the last time she was permitted to enjoy the assembly of the church militant, but she left a testimony behind her of the great power of Jesus to save to the uttermost, and her life was a continual proof of the truthfulness of her verbal testimony.

March 16, 1869, she was united in marriage to Rev. George M. Webber, a member of the Central Illinois Conference. As a pastor's

wife she was greatly beloved in all the charges where stationed, and never wearied in the burdens and peculiar responsibilities of her calling.

As a wife she was a model in many respects and her home was always full of sunshine as far as she could make it so.

As a mother to her children, none could be more devoted. She constantly sought to impress them with the great truths of the gospel and early instilled into them the principles of our holy religion.

A good woman has gone out from us to enrich the Church Triumphant, and though she be dead, yet she shall speak by and through her good works which follow her.

SUSIE J. DAVENPORT.

Susie J., daughter of A. M. and C. A. Harvey, was born in Hancock county, Indiana, September 12, 1863, and, after an illness of nine days, departed this life at the parsonage in Brimfield, Illinois, June 21, 1894, aged 30 years, 9 months and 9 days.

With her parents she removed to Polk county, Iowa in 1876 or '77. She received her education at Penn Seminary, Ackworth, Iowa, an institution under control of the Society of Friends, and at our own college, Simpson, at Indianola, Iowa.

She joined the Methodist Episcopal Church during the winter of 1880-81, although she was not made a partaker of saving grace, as she insisted upon it ever afterward, until two or three years later. She experienced the blessing of entire sanctification while at college in Indianola, during the year 1885, and ever after that great event she set for herself a very high standard of action, developing an extraordinary conscientiousness in the minutest details of life.

Early in life she felt called to be a missionary, impressed that she should go into "the regions beyond" and tell the inhabitants thereof of "the lamb slain from the foundation of the world, the Lamb of God which taketh away the sins of the world." This impression crystallized, the vague notions took definite, tangible form when she was made perfect in love. She saw Ethiopia imploringly stretch out her hands unto God, and through the direction and influence of one of God's anointed ones, gave herself for Bishop Taylor's work in Africa. She bade good-bye to father and mother and friends, turned her back upon the home and associations of her childhood and eagerly set her face toward "the dark continent" in the fall of 1886, landing in Africa about December 1 of the same year. She was appointed to the work at Dondo, Angola Province, immediately on her arrival, and at once entered upon her arduous duties. She remained at the front on the battle line until March 17, 1888, when, for the reason that she believed the general method of self supporting missionary work in Africa could not succeed without too great an outlay of time and lives, and believing that the great church to which she belonged was both able and willing to bear all legitimate expense of missionary work by Methodist Episcopalians in Africa, she sailed for the United States, arriving in New Orleans, Louisiana, April 29, 1888. She

never abandoned the thought or hope of returning to the foreign field. She regarded herself as swept by the current of events into an eddy of temporary cessation from labor among the heathen in foreign lands until the providence of God should open the way for her return. Meantime the great cause of Missions, the world for Jesus, was upon her heart. With this great interest constantly upon her spirit, she organized auxiliaries of the Weman's Foreign Missionary Society at Melvin and Roberts, and greatly stimulated and strengthened those at Reynolds and Brimfield. An incident in the closing scene of her life may serve to show how fully this great missionary idea, this thought of saving the people, occupied her mind. Within a few hours of the time she reached the ford and crossed over the stream, she took the hand of the physician who so faithfully ministered to her, and would not release her hold until at her urgent, persistent request, he had promised to meet her where the pure in heart look upon the face of God. Thus was the ruling passion strong in death.

She was joined in marriage to the Rev. C. L. Davenport, then a fellow missionary in Bishop Taylor's work in Africa, at Dondo, Africa, October 15, 1887, Rev. Joseph Wilks, officiating. From that time till they set sail for their native land, her work was with that of her husband at Dondo, Africa, and in Central Illinois Conference at Campus, for a few months preceding the Conference session of 1888; one year at Del Rey; three years at Melvin and Roberts; one year at Reynolds; and at Brimfield, where after three quarters of a year of very highly appreciated toil, she finished her race, reached the goal and won the prize.

Four children blessed this happy union; two boys and two girls. The little boys preceded their mother to the heavenly country, and now, hand in hand on either side of her walk in the presence of the Lamb; while her little girls, one a lambkin of three months, and the other, Mary, of four summers, are left to the care of their father.

A word remains to be said concerning the time immediately preceding the hour when our brother stood companionless and these children cried, motherless, among men. Her last hours were in perfect keeping with the statement of our beloved founder under God, "Our people die well." Grave symptoms appeared almost from the beginning of her illness, and from the first, somber apprehensions were sustained. Yet it was not thought that she was seriously, dangerously ill until within forty-eight hours of the time when she breathed her last. But when the symptoms became alarming, not for one moment did the disease stay in its progress until she was no more. Physically the end was full of agony; spiritually, it was grace abounding and peace like a river.

The truth is, doubtless, as God sees it, that sister Davenport began to die eight years ago in Africa, and no matter what the seemings may be, she died a martyr in her devotion to the Lord and Master. The African fever never entirely left her, but anon it would appear, announcing to her, as we now know, that the end was approaching. At 5:30 on Friday afternoon, June 21, after in her partial delirium, she insisted again and again that she and her husband should arise and go hence, she quietly shut her eyelids down, to open them no more on the faces of those

she loved on earth, and one more name was added to the illustrious roll of those who have given their lives for the salvation of the world.

She resigned her husband and children to God without a struggle. She gave directions concerning her burial as though she was preparing for a fete. When the arrangements were perfected she had those around her sing the songs of the sanctuary as she waved farewell. She was anchored, and so they sang, "In the rifted Rock I'm resting, sure and safe from all alarm." She most fully expected a joyous meeting with the whole family of God, the company which no man can number on yonder side, and those who on this storm-swept side of the stream whose best thoughts of the hereafter and its re-union, is expressed in the words,

"We shall meet in the sweet bye and bye,"

and then at her request they sang,

"What a gathering of the faithful that will be."

So as her sun when down to her was sung our hope big with immortality, and when she saw the sun rise in heaven, among the harpers on the sea of glass, the four and twenty vested elders, and the throng of overcomers, they sang the song of Moses, the servant of God, and the song of the Lamb.

May God bless us till we come to the trysting place of the righteous in the house not made with hands, and with our sainted sister we are forever with the Lord.

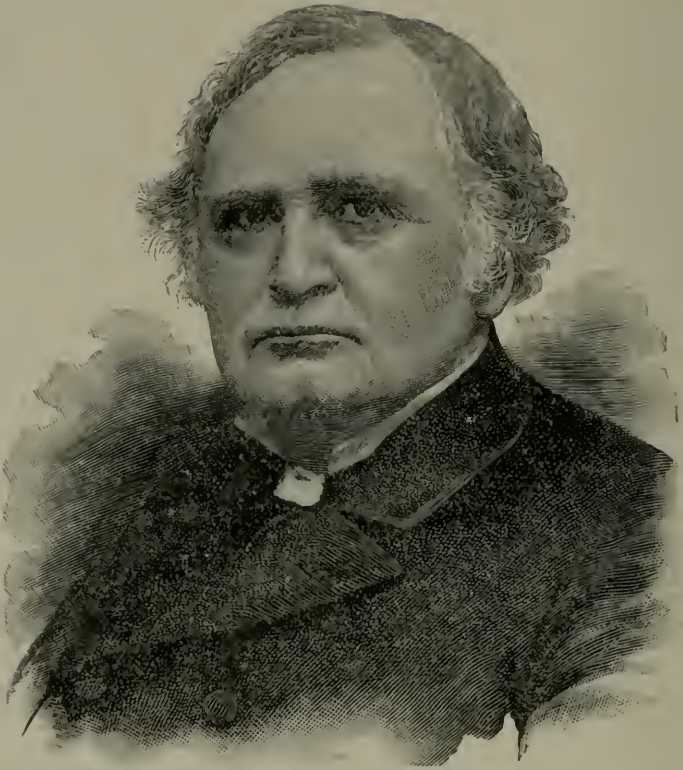

FIRST DAY.

PEORIA, ILLINOIS, September 18, 1895.

Fortieth Session.—The Central Illinois Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church met for its fortieth session in the First M. E. Church, Peoria, Illinois, at 8:30 a. m., Bishop Daniel A. Goodsell in the chair.

Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.—The Bishop, assisted by the Presiding Elders, administered the sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

Roll Call.—The Secretary of the last Conference called the roll, and 172 members and probationers responded to their names.

Organization.—On motion of M. V. Crumbaker, H. K. Metcalf was re-elected Secretary by acclamation, with power to name his assistants.

The Secretary appointed D. S. McCown and J. F. Robinson.

On motion of G. J. Luckey, L. F. Cullom was elected Statistical Secretary, with power to appoint his assistants, and he named I. Willett Puffer, T. A. Beall, G. D. Hensell, W. F. Jameson, John Rogers and Vincent Aten.

For Treasurer, C. O. McCulloch nominated Alexander Smith, and R. B. Williams nominated Samuel Van Pelt. A count vote was taken which resulted in 65 for A. Smith, and 72 for S. Van Pelt, and the latter was declared elected, with power to name his assistants. D. F. Wilson, J. H. Ryan and O. T. Dwinell were appointed.

Conference Hours.—On motion of C. O. McCulloch the hour for opening the Conference session was fixed at 9 A. M., and the hour of adjournment at 11:45 A. M.

Gospel in All Lands.—On motion of C. O. McCulloch, W. H. Clark was appointed agent for *The Gospel in All Lands*.

Order of the Day.—On motion of C. O. McCulloch the time for electing delegates to the General Conference was fixed at 10 a. m., Friday.

J. S. Cumming moved to fix the time for the vote on Constitutional changes at 10 a. m., Thursday. W. H. Hunter moved, as a substitute, to fix the time at 10 a. m., Monday. The vote to substitute prevailed, and the substitute was adopted.

Reports.—On motion of J. B. Dille, L. F. Cullom and S. Van Pelt were directed to collect the pastor's reports.

Railroad Secretary.—On motion of C. O. McCulloch, D. B. Johnson was elected Railroad Secretary.

Appeal.—M. A. Head presented an appeal from a member of Rock Island First Church Quarterly Conference from the decision of G. J. Luckey, Presiding Elder, to the Bishop, who reserved his decision.

The Eighteenth Question:—"Who have Withdrawn?" was called. The Secretary read a communication from C. L. Davenport requesting permission to withdraw from the ministry and membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church, with a certificate of standing.

On motion of C. O. McCulloch, the request to withdraw was granted and the Secretary directed to record the withdrawal upon his parchments, which had been surrendered.

C. O. McCulloch moved that C. L. Davenport be granted a certificate of standing. G. J. Luckey moved as a substitute that he be notified by the Secretary of the action of the Conference in his case. H. Richey moved to amend the substitute by adding to the notification that at the time of his withdrawal there were no charges against his moral character. On motion of B. E. Kaufman the whole matter was laid on the table.

The Secretary read a communication from J. E. Wasson requesting permission to withdraw from the ministry and membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

On motion of J. S. Cumming the request was granted.

The Twenty-second Question:—"Who are the Supernumerary Preachers?" was taken up.

C. O. McCulloch moved that any brother on the supernumerary list desiring to be changed to the effective list, be directed to appear before the Committee on Conference Relations. B. E. Kaufman moved as a substitute that the whole list of supernumerary preachers be referred to the Committee on Conference Relations. The motion to substitute prevailed, and the substitute was adopted.

The Twenty-third Question:—"Who are the Superannuated Preachers?" was taken up.

On motion of W. H. Hunter, the whole list of Superannuates was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.

The Fifteenth Question:—"Who have died?" was taken up.

V. C. Randolph and G. W. Miller were reported as having died.

Reconsideration.—On motion of B. E. Kaufman, the motion granting J. E. Wasson permission to withdraw was reconsidered by a count vote of 71 to 34. On motion J. E. Wasson was granted permission to withdraw, and the Secretary was directed to demand his parchments and papers certifying to his ministerial standing.

Introduced.—The following brethren were introduced: Dr. S. A. Kean, of Cincinnati Conference; B. B. Ussher, Bishop of the Reformed Episcopal

Church; C. W. Hyatt, pastor of the First Congregational Church, Peoria; J. S. Woods, pastor of the African M. E. Church, Peoria; D. A. Perrin, of the Southern Illinois Conference; D. P. Black and Frank Bruner, of the Illinois Conference; Thomas Craven, of the India Conference, and W. A. Spencer, Secretary of the Church Extension Society.

On motion, the Conference adjourned, after calling the committees and making announcements.

The Doxology was sung, and Bishop Ussher pronounced the Benediction.

SECOND DAY.

THURSDAY, September 19, 1895.

Conference met at 9 a. m. with Bishop Goodsell in the chair.

Devotional Services.—On motion of W. H. Hunter it was decided that the services conducted by Dr. S. A. Kean each day from 8 to 9 a. m. be recognized as the devotional exercises of the Conference.

The Journal of yesterday's session was read and approved.

Roll Call.—The Secretary called the roll of absentees and 17 members and probationers answered to their names. On motion it was decided to dispense with the further calling of the roll.

Delinquents.—The Statistical Secretary called the list of delinquent charges.

Dr. Spencer was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Letter of Condolence.—On motion of R. Haney, J. S. Cumming was appointed to write a letter of condolence and sympathy to Dr. Tallman.

Presiding Eldership.—G. R. Palmer presented the following:

Resolved, That when a Presiding Elder shall have served a full term of six consecutive years, we respectfully request the Bishop presiding to return him to the pastorate whether his term of service shall have been spent on one district or divided among several districts.

The resolution was adopted.

Number of Districts.—G. R. Palmer presented the following:

Resolved, That we most respectfully and earnestly request the Bishop presiding at this annual Conference to reduce the number of districts from seven, the present number, to five.

On motion of J. G. Evans the previous question was ordered. The resolution was adopted by a count vote of 114 to 38.

The Seventh Question:—"Who have been admitted into Full Membership?" was taken up. On motion of J. W. Frizzelle it was voted that the Pastors report the amounts of Missionary and Conference Claimant's collections and whether all the collections are taken. The characters of the following were passed, they reported their collections, answered the disciplinary questions and were addressed by the Bishop: Wm. D. Benjamin, Cyrus E. Harvey, John May, Julius C. Zeller and Cyrus A. Wright. The Committee on Examination reported, the Presiding Elders made their representation and the following were admitted into Full Membership and elected to Deacon's orders: Wm. D. Benjamin, John May, Julius C. Zeller.

On motion of M. V. Crumbaker, Cyrus E. Harvey was continued on Trial in the studies of the third year.

It was stated by Thomas Doney that Cyrus A. Wright comes to us with credentials from the Methodist Church of Canada. On motion of C. O.

McCulloch it was voted that all brethren coming with credentials from other churches be referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.

The Bishop announced the transfer of Nelson W. Atkins, a probationer of the second year, from the Southern Illinois Conference. On motion of R. B. Williams the certificate of examination from the Southern Illinois Conference was accepted and after he had answered the disciplinary questions, he was admitted into full membership, being a Deacon.

On motion of C. O. McCulloch the time was extended.

Dr. Earl Cranston was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Wesley Hospital.—James S. Harvey, Treasurer and Superintendent of Wesley Hospital, Chicago, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

On motion of J. W. Frizzelle the Chair was requested to appoint a committee of three on Wesley Hospital. The following were appointed: C. W. Ayling, C. W. Blodgett, A. M. Stocking.

Minute Editors and Publisher.—On motion of H. D. Clark, the Secretary and Statistical Secretary were appointed Editors, and N. T. Allen Publisher of the Conference minutes.

On motion of J. F. James the Conference adjourned. The announcements were made, and Dr. Hartzell pronounced the Benediction.

THIRD DAY.

FRIDAY, September 20, 1895.

Devotional services were conducted from 8 to 9 a. m.

At 9 o'clock Bishop Goodsell took the chair.

Kaufman the Bishop was asked to read all the names on the last ballot for whom five or more ballots had been cast. A ballot was then taken and the Tellers retired.

The Eleventh Question:—"What others have been Elected and Ordained Deacons?" was taken up. The recommendations of the following were presented, the committee reported on their examination, the Presiding Elders made representations and they were elected Deacons as Local Preachers: Addison F. The Third Question:—"Who have been received on Credentials, and from what Churches?" was called. On motion of Thomas Doney, Cyrus A. Wright was admitted into full membership on his credentials from the Methodist Church in Canada and elected Deacon. On motion of C. O. McCulloch, Nelson J. Brown was admitted into full membership on his credentials from the Methodist Church in Canada and his orders were recognized, he being an Elder.

Dr. W. H. Wilder, President of Illinois Wesleyan University, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Report of Tellers.—The Bishop announced the result of the ballot: Whole number of votes cast, 138; necessary to a choice, 70. G. J. Luckey having received 80 votes was declared elected Second Reserve Delegate.

The Twenty-first Question:—"What other Personal Notation should be made?" was recalled. On motion of G. J. Luckey it was ordered that all brethren who seek for recognition of orders be required to answer the question: "Will you wholly abstain from the use of tobacco?" The orders of Hiram L. On motion of J. W. Frizzelle the Conference adjourned after the announcements were made.

Bishop Taylor pronounced the Benediction.

The memoir of V. C. Randolph was read by J. G. Evans. Remarks were made by Richard Crewes, J. B. Dille and Dr. S. A. Kean.

F. H. Cumming read an obituary of Geo. W. Havermale, a former member of this Conference.

The Doxology was sung and J. S. Cumming pronounced the Benediction.

Davis was continued on trial in the studies of the third year, and the Bishop was requested to leave him without appointment to attend school.

The Seventh Question was recalled. On motion of M. V. Crumbaker, the motion by which Cyrus E. Harvey was continued on trial was reconsidered. On motion of M. V. Crumbaker, Cyrus E. Harvey was admitted to full membership, and advanced to the studies of the third year, he being a deacon.

The Fourth Question:—"Who Have Been Received on Trial?" was taken up. The Examining Committee reported, the Elders made representations, and the following were admitted on trial: Addison F. Butters, Rudolph H. Schuett, Warren S. Welsh, Joseph A. Chapman. The following were ad-

mitted on trial, but were conditioned on studies in which they were deficient: Owen Truitt, Wm. S. Green and Wm. S. Porter.

"Divine Life."—Dr. S. A. Kean addressed the Conference in the interests of the magazine called *The Divine Life*.

Dr. S. A. Kean.—The Conference passed resolutions commending the work of Dr. Kean and inviting him to visit our Conference at its next annual session. (See Resolutions.)

Constitutional Changes.—On motion of J. W. Frizzelle the Order of the Day, voting on the Constitutional Changes, was taken up. Proposition I was read by the Secretary. The report of the Committee on Constitutional Changes was presented. On motion of C. O. McCulloch the report was divided. The first part of the report recommending that we do not vote on the Hamilton Amendment was adopted by a count vote of 125 for to 18 against. The second part of the report recommending that we adopt the amendment of the second restrictive rule proposed by the Baltimore Annual Conference was adopted by a count vote of 141 for to 7 against.

On motion the part of the report recommending the adoption of the resolution adopted by the West Wisconsin Conference favoring the change in time of the meeting of the General Conference was adopted by a count vote of 150 for to none against.

The report of the committee as a whole was adopted.

Proposition III was read by the Secretary.

C. W. Blodgett moved that the Conference adopt the proposition submitted by the Colorado Annual Conference favoring the change of Ratio of Ministerial Representation. The motion prevailed by a count vote of 155 for to none against.

On motion of O. T. Dwinell the time was extended.

A desire being expressed to vote as individuals on the Hamilton Amendment the Second Restrictive Rule the following were counted: Ayes 2, Noes 96.

On motion of R. B. Williams the Conference adjourned to meet a 2 p. m. Bishop Goodsell pronounced the Benediction.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference met at 2 p. m. with J. G. Evans in the chair by appointment of the Bishop. C. W. Blodgett led in prayer.

Geo. M. Brown of the North Nebraska Conference, was introduced and addressed the Conference in the interest of the Chautauqua Vesper Service.

A resolution respecting a Missionary course of study was presented and adopted. (See resolution).

Excused. The following brethren were excused from further attendance upon the Conference: F. W. Merrell, S. P. Alford, E. W. Thompson, C. A. Wright.

The Board of Stewards made their final report and distributed the Conference Fund. (See Report.)

Reports.—The report of the Committee on Conference Examinations was presented. On motion of G. L. Taylor the report was adopted by a count vote of 56 for to 14 against.

The report of the Committee on Epworth League was presented. C. W. Blodgett moved to consider the report item by item. On motion of G. W.

Kling the first part of the report was adopted. R. H. Figgins moved to adopt the second item. M. F. Havermale moved as a substitute to strike out the second item. J. J. Hunter moved to recommit all of the report not yet adopted, which was carried.

The reports of the Committees on Sunday Schools and Tracts, The Episcopal Fund, Post Offices, Sanctity of the Sabbath, Book Accounts and Periodicals, Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, American Bible Society, and Freedman's Aid and Southern Education Society were adopted. On motion of J. S. Cumming the report of the Committee on Church Extension was re-committed for the filling of Blanks. The report of the Committee on the Use of Tobacco was read. On motion of J. F. James the report was amended by substituting the word "use" for the word traffic, and the report as amended was adopted.

The Committee on Epworth League presented the part of their report that was re-committed as revised. On motion of J. W. Frizzelle the motion by which it was ordered to consider the report item by item was re-considered. The motion to so consider the report was lost. On motion of M. F. Havermale the part of the report not already adopted was adopted.

The report of the Committee on Temperance was adopted by a count vote, 96 for and none against.

Conference Temperance Society.—On motion of G. L. Taylor the officers of the Conference Temperance Society were re-elected for the ensuing year. (See List)

Treasurer's Blank.—On motion of W. H. Witter D. F. Wilson was appointed a committee to draft a plan to aid the Conference Treasurer in making his annual report.

Custodian of Historical Material.—The report of the Custodian of Historical material was read and adopted. On motion of J. W. Denning the pastors of the Conference were requested to gather and forward all papers and materials of historical value to the Custodian. On motion of B. E. Kaufman, J. W. Denning was appointed Conference Custodian. On motion of J. S. Cumming, T. C. Moots was requested to gather all papers and articles of interest he can and forward to the Custodian.

Bishop Taylor addressed the Conference concerning his work in Africa.

Bill.—The Secretary presented a bill of \$7.25 for expenses, which was allowed and ordered paid from the Minute Fund.

On motion of C. F. Crane the Conference adjourned to meet at 7:30 p. m. The Doxology was sung and H. Ritchie pronounced the Benediction.

EVENING SESSION.

Conference met at 7:30 p. m. with G. R. Palmer in the chair by appointment of the Bishop. M. F. Havermale led in prayer.

The Journal of the afternoon session was read and approved.

Official Record.—On motion of the Secretary the printed minutes were made the official record of the Conference.

Board of Church Extension.—On motion of R. Crewes the report of the Committee on Church Extension was adopted with the privilege of filling the two blanks from the Treasurer's report. On motion of R. Crewes the officers and managers of the Conference Board of Church Extension were re-elected.

Reports.—The Committee on Domestic Missions presented majority and minority reports. On motion of J. G. Evans the majority report was adopted by a count vote of 118 for to none against.

W. H. Hunter, Agent of the Conference Claimants Society made his report and it was adopted. The Managers of the Conference Claimants Society made their report including nominations of officers of the Society which was adopted.

The report of the Committee on Wesley Hospital was read and adopted.

The report of the Committee on the State of the Church was read. R. A. Brown moved to amend by adding the number of the Juniors to those of the members of the Epworth League so that the report would agree in statement with the Epworth League report. The amendment was adopted and the report as amended was adopted.

Change of Relation.—The Committee on Conference Relations recommended that W. H. Cooper be permitted to withdraw from the ministry and membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and that the Presiding Elder of the District in which Bardolph is located demand his certificate of recognition of orders and whatsoever parchments he may possess. The recommendation was adopted. The committee presented a resolution recommending that R. G. Pearce be placed upon the supernumerary list, which was adopted. (See Resolution.)

Reports.—The report of the Committee on Education was read. Addresses were made by J. G. Evans and S. Van Pelt. J. G. Evans moved to add to the report the action of last year in regard to the division of funds and the motion prevailed. The report was adopted.

The Treasurer made his report, which was adopted.

Children's Home Society.—On motion of D. B. Johnson, W. D. H. Young was permitted to represent the Children's Home Society.

Minute Roll.—The publisher of the minutes called the roll for subscriptions to the Conference Minutes.

Consolidation of Societies.—A resolution concerning the consolidation of the Freedman's Aid and Education Society was read and adopted. (See Resolution.)

The Statistical Secretary presented his report and it was adopted without reading. On motion of N. T. Allen it was voted to omit from the published minutes the Statistics of Table No. 2 except as to three items as was done last year.

Thanks.—Resolutions of Thanks to various parties were presented and adopted by a rising vote. (See Resolutions.)

The Journal of the evening session thus far was read and approved.

Bill.—The bill of the Statistical Secretary for 55 cents was presented and allowed and ordered paid from the Minute Fund.

Educational Society.—On motion of J. G. Evans the officers of the Educational Society elected two years ago were re-elected.

Change of Relation.—On motion the relation of T. H. Pryor and J. W. McCord was changed from effective to supernumerary.

Transfer.—On motion of J. W. Haney the Bishop was requested to transfer Joseph Hart to our Conference.

The Bishop took the chair.

A resolution of thanks to the Bishop was adopted by a rising vote.

Changes of Relation.—The Committee on Conference Relations recommended that all the members of the Conference give heed to a resolution passed years ago by the Conference concerning the invasion of any pastor's charge; also that M. L. Haney be continued in the supernumerary list, which was adopted.

On motion, the relations of G. M. Webber, W. R. Warner and M. V. B. White were changed from the effective to the supernumerary. The relation of T. J. Wood was changed from the effective to the superannuated. On motion Louis McKown was discontinued with permission to be employed as a supply, when certain financial conditions are met.

The Triers of Appeals were appointed as follows: A. P. Beall, J. B. Dille, R. D. Russell, F. W. Merrell, Joe Bell, F. H. Cumming, G. R. Palmer.

The Examining Committees were nominated and approved. (See list.)

Missionary Sermon.—R. A. Brown was appointed to preach the Missionary Sermon, and Thomas Doney as alternate.

Transfers.—The Bishop announced the transfers of Lauchlin McLellan to the South Dakota Conference, J. J. Walter and W. T. Kerr to the Oregon Conference; and of Nelson W. Atkins from the Southern Illinois Conference and C. W. Gaither, a Deacon in the first class, from the Kansas Conference.

The Boards of Church Location were nominated and approved. (See list.)

Registrar.—W. J. Minium was re-appointed Conference Registrar.

On motion of J. W. Haney it was voted that after reading of the Journal and the reading of the appointments we stand adjourned *sine die*. The Journal was read and approved.

Bishop Goodsell led in prayer, addressed the Conference, read the appointments and pronounced the Benediction.

Lay Electoral Conference.

PEORIA, ILL., Sept. 20th, 1895.

The Lay Electoral Conference of the Central Illinois Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church met at Hale Chapel, Peoria, and was called to order by J. H. Bunn, who was elected temporary chairman.

John Prickett, of Lewistown, was elected temporary secretary.

The following Committee on Credentials was appointed: J. N. Morgan, Douglas Evans and J. S. Thompson.

J. W. Haney and C. O. McCulloch appeared as a committee from the annual Conference, bearing a cordial invitation to meet with the annual Conference at 2 p. m. in the Christian Church. On motion the invitation was accepted.

Thomas Craven, of the India Conference, was called for and addressed the Conference.

The Committee on Credentials reported on the members present and it was ordered that the list be accepted as reported. It was ordered that any other delegate arriving should report to the Secretary.

It was voted that we proceed to the nomination and election of the chairman of the permanent organization.

The following nominations were made: Brothers Durham, Davis, McCord and Noftsker.

It was ordered that the election be by ballot and that the candidate receiving the greatest number of votes be declared elected.

E. D. Durham being declared elected came forward and made a few appropriate remarks.

It was ordered that the secretary be elected by acclamation.

E. C. Curtis, of Grant Park, was elected.

J. D. Watkins, of Sheldon, was elected Assistant Secretary.

On motion of W. H. McCord it was ordered that a committee of five on resolutions be appointed and that all resolutions be referred to them. On motion the committee was increased to seven; one from each district.

J. G. Williams, W. H. Foster, D. Evans, Nathan Giles, Thomas Anderson, J. A. Creel and B. W. Johnson.

Papers from the Cincinnati, Baltimore and other Conferences were referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

It was voted to proceed to the election of delegates to the General Conference.

It was moved that nominations be limited to simply naming the candidates. After eight candidates had been named it was voted that nominations be now closed.

It was moved that we elect a delegate from each side of the Illinois river.
—Carried.

It was moved that we proceed to elect a delegate from the east side. On motion it was ordered that three tellers be appointed by the chair.

Brothers Van Vooris, McCord and Davis were appointed.

Moved that the successful candidate must receive a majority vote.—
Carried.

A ballot was then taken and the tellers retired.

John Main, of Muscatine, Iowa, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

The first ballot resulted in no election.

It was moved that the candidate receiving the next largest number of votes cast be the reserve delegate.

A second ballot was taken which resulted in the election of C. H. Long, of Pontiac, as delegate, and J. S. Thompson, of Lacon, as reserve delegate.

The first and second ballots for candidates west of the river, resulted in no election. The ballot was taken which resulted in the election of W. H. Logan, of Seaton, as delegate, and John Prickett, of Lewistown, as reserve delegate.

On motion these elections were made unanimous.

On motion the conference adjourned to meet in fraternal session at 2 p. m. in the Christian Church.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

After the Fraternal Session the Conference reassembled at 3 o'clock with E. D. Durham in the Chair.

The Committee on Resolutions reported, and the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved. That in view of the position of the women in the home, in society, in the state, and in the body of the Church, as conservators of all that is purest and strongest, it is the sense of this body that they should be eligible to service as delegates to the highest body of the Church, the General Conference.

Resolved. That as lay members of the M. E. Church, we reaffirm our adherence to the doctrines of total abstinence and prohibition, the recognized position of our Church.

Resolved. That it is the sense of this body that the representation of the Annual Conferences in the General Conference should be equally divided between the Ministers and the Laity.

Resolved. That it is the sense of this body that the time limit of Pastorates should neither be extended or removed.

Resolved. That the plan adopted by the Cincinnati Conference, providing for a Lay Association, or some similar plan is, in the judgment of this body entirely practicable and likely to be of great value to the Church.

Resolved. That it is the sense of this body that the interests of the Central Illinois Conference would be as well served if we had five districts instead of seven.

On motion the following were appointed a committee on the organization of an Annual Layman's Conference: W. H. Foster, J. H. Bunn, and W. H. McCord.

The Conference was addressed by Dr. W. H. Wilder, of Bloomington, in the interests of Wesleyan University; by Dr. J. G. Evans, of Abingdon, in the interests of Hedding College, and by Dr. G. R. Palmer, of Onarga, in the interests of Grand Prairie Seminary.

A vote of thanks was tendered to these speakers, to the Chairman and Secretary, and to the Committee on Resolutions, and the Conference adjourned.

Of this, the General Fund, derived chiefly from collections, but including also special gifts for Frontier Churches, \$250 each, and Mountain Fund specials, of \$100 each, for use by donations to churches, has attained..... \$ 3,482,000.00

With this the Board has aided 9,744 churches—more than one-third of the entire number owned by our Church.

Churches within our bounds have received aid up to November 1st, 1894, the close of the last Church Extension year, to the number of seventy-four.

It is manifest that the efficiency and value of the Loan Fund depend upon the fidelity and promptness of churches, borrowing from it, in meeting their obligations. To fail in this is a most serious fault, which the Board in Philadelphia, as the custodians of the fund, should not, under any circumstances permit. We urge our churches to meet every obligation with the strictest fidelity.

Christianity in Earnest, being issued every two months, gives fresh and valuable information concerning Church Extension, and suggestive discussions of this and kindred subjects. It is a great help to the pastors, and a larger circulation among our people, especially our official members, would promote the interests of this cause.

Glad Tidings, with its service of song and condensed information, is pre-eminently adapted for a Church Extension service in every church and Sunday School. We cordially recommend its use in taking the Annual Collections.

Church Architecture has been greatly improved under the auspices of the Board, and we earnestly advise all who contemplate building to avail themselves of the facilities which the Board has to offer.

In organizing new churches, and in taking titles to church property, there should be great care to conform to the laws of the State and the Discipline of the Church. The necessary information is now accessible to all in the new book, "The Religion of the Republic," by Dr. A. J. Kynett, published by our Western Book Concern. This and the necessary blank forms for incorporation of churches, title deeds, etc., can be obtained at our Western Book Depositories.

We recommend for adoption the following Resolutions:

1. We congratulate the Church upon the great work accomplished by our Board of Church Extension, and commend it to the enlarged liberality of all our people.

2. The fact that our country is new, that our population doubles in less than thirty years, so that within another quarter of a century we shall exceed a hundred millions of people, and that the powers of evil are intensely active, demand that the work of Church Extension shall immediately be greatly enlarged and more than doubled in the quarter of a century to come.

3. We will not be content until, in the enlargement of this work under direction of the General Committee and Board of Church Extension we shall fully perform the part assigned us as a Conference.

4. In order to do this we will, in our several appointments, avail ourselves of the helps provided by the Board, in *Christianity in Earnest* and *Glad Tidings*, and will endeavor to lead all our churches to respond in full to the call made upon them in pursuance of the plans of the Discipline.

DOMESTIC MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

1. We regret to find that a minority of the pastors of the Conference took the collection for Domestic Missions as ordered by the action of the Conference one year ago. This failure resulted in serious embarrassment to the Society and to the men who were employed by the Presiding Elders, as appropriations amounting to \$2,950 had been made, and the receipts amounted to less than \$400.

2. There is great need for the existence and work of this Society within our bounds, and we recommend its continuance with an earnest plea that every pastor shall take the collection for Domestic Missions not later than November, and report the same immediately to the Treasurer.

3. While we would not detract from our contributions in the Parent Missionary Society, we believe that the policy of neglecting the destitute portions of the home field is suicidal, and ought not to be encouraged.

EDUCATION.

Your Committee on Education begs leave to report as follows:

ILLINOIS WESLEYAN UNIVERSITY.

It is with devout gratitude to almighty God, that we record the fact of the increasing prosperity and influence of the Illinois Wesleyan University. During the Collegiate Year, 1894-5, 1,184 students *in residentia*, and 444 *in absentia*, received instruction in its various schools.

An Observatory Building has been erected, and in addition to the excellent six-inch refracting telescope, there has been added a splendid reflecting instrument, 18½ inches in diameter, the gift of Mr C. A. Behr, of Chicago. This instrument is provided with right ascension and declination circles, a driving clock and a two-inch finder, a parallel wire micrometer, a position micrometer, and a complete outfit of eye pieces, shades, etc. A visual and photographic spectroscope has been designed, a duplicate of the one now in use in the Pottsdam (Germany) Observatory.

This outfit enables the University to offer opportunities equal to the very best for astronomical study and investigation. In fact, it has made complete the material equipment of the University for investigation in all experimental sciences.

The Church is to be congratulated on having an institution so thoroughly equipped for research under the direction of a body of men and women of the most thorough scholarship and the highest Christian character, who are awake to the best methods of the so-called "New Education."

The large increase of students in the College of Letters and Preparatory Schools, made it necessary to employ one additional instructor in the College and three in the Preparatory School. Enlarged pupilage makes a new building for recitation purposes a necessity.

We most heartily approve of the plans now being formulated for a new Hall and Home for young women, and recommend that our people heartily co-operate with the authorities of the University in securing the funds necessary for its erection and complete furnishing. While increased endowment,

additional facilities, and thorough and efficient faculties, furnish ground for rejoicing, and the increased patronage of students indicates a greater interest in Christian Education, we would remind our people that this enlarged sphere of usefulness has increased the responsibilities of the University, and as additional buildings and endowment are a necessity, whenever opportunity offers we will set forth the claims of the University, believing that money invested for this purpose will perpetually yield large profits, in enriching the life of the Church and of humanity.

We heartily approve the administration of the affairs of the University, and recommend the election of H. D. Clark, W. M. Dever, T. H. Bunn, and G. R. Palmer, Trustees for the Class of 1898. We also recommend T. Doney, R. Crewes, R. B. Williams, J. S. Cumming and J. Bell, as Conference Visitors.

GRAND PRAIRIE SEMINARY.

We record with pleasure the fact of the large increase in attendance reaching last year 414 students; which places the Central Illinois Conference Seminary among the first in attendance in Methodism.

We record the further fact that \$12,800 has been secured in good subscriptions during the last three months, toward paying the balance on the large outlay for buildings and improvements made in the past eight years. We announce the additional gratifying fact that during the past summer a bequest of property worth about \$10,000 has been secured.

It is a matter of interest to the Conference and to all patrons of education that the Conference Seminary is requiring very high scholastic preparation in its Faculty. One member is a Classical Graduate from Illinois Wesleyan University, with Post Graduate work in Boston University; another, an A. B. from Wellesley College; another, an A. B. from Ohio Wesleyan with highest rank in Modern Languages; another, a Ph. B. from Northwestern, with special distinction; another, an A. B. from Knox College, with first honor; another, an A. B. from Hedding College, after two years at DePauw and two in Chicago University; another, a graduate from Illinois State Normal, another, from Mussulman's Business College; another, from Oberlin Conservatory and Leipsic.

WHEREAS, Miss Phœbe Van Benschoten, who has been an Instructor for twenty years, and Preceptress for twelve years in our Conference Seminary, has resigned her position for a period of travel and study in Europe,

Resolved, That we hereby express our appreciation of her long and distinguished services as Instructor in our Seminary.

We congratulate the institution upon the employment of Miss Clara Bacon, of Abingdon, a Wellesley graduate, as Preceptress.

We rejoice that the Trustees are preparing to liquidate the entire debt of the Seminary, and would recommend that as soon as all obligations are met, the Trustees plan for the securing of an adequate endowment for the school.

We recommend the appointment of Samuel Van Pelt, A. M., D. D., as President, and John Rogers, R. B. Williams, J. E. Mercer, J. Wilkinson, R. H. Figgins, J. F. Robinson and W. J. Minium, as Conference Visitors, and B. F. Tallman, as Financial Secretary.

HEDDING COLLEGE.

It is with pleasure that we report the continued prosperity of this Institution.

The enlargement of the facilities for the very best work, coupled with superior advantages offered in the Class Room, the deep, religious tone that pervades the Institution, together with the energy and efficiency of the President, Rev. J. G. Evans, have had the effect of adding largely to the enrollment of the students.

Hedding College has an honored past. It has sent forth to the world hundreds of students whose Christian lives have been a blessing to the world, but never has the outlook been brighter than to-day. Last year the students numbered 364.

With the property of the Abingdon College, built by the Disciple Church at a cost of \$60,000, now held by some of the members of the Faculty, subject to the demands of the Board of Trustees—its equipment in buildings is not surpassed in the West.

The location of Hedding is unsurpassed. With its needs supplied, there is no reason why the enrollment should not be greatly enlarged.

The management has prevented the increase of the debt for running expenses. This has been done by the generosity of the Faculty, who have in the past few years donated nearly \$10,000 out of their meager salaries.

Secret College Fraternities, match games in Athletics with students of other institutions, and the use of tobacco by students are strictly prohibited. This action has proven of great assistance in the administration of Christian discipline. We commend the authorities for their courageous and manly attitude on these vexed questions.

The death of Prof. Randolph was a great loss to the School. He lives in the lives of the many who sat at his feet for instruction. Prof. A. C. Piersel has been elected to the chair made vacant by the death of Prof. Randolph; and Prof. A. W. Ryan, to the chair of German and History. Both have entered on their duties and are winning golden opinions.

We recommend that the President, with such other members as he may call to his help, arrange for a series of Educational Conventions in every patronizing district. We pledge the President our hearty support in these Conventions, and will do all we can to aid him in the raising of at least \$50,000 this year on the Endowment Fund, and to pay for buildings now held in trust for the Board of Trustees.

We believe it the imperative duty, and it should be considered a great privilege, for the parents of our Church to send their boys and girls to our own Methodist Institutions. Especially where they are sent from home should they be placed under the influence of Methodistic usages, and this because hundreds of our young people are lost by their associations with schools of other denominations.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. J. G. Evans, D. D., LL. D., President; and Rev. A. A. Waters, A. M., B. D., as Professor.

AMERICAN UNIVERSITY.

Concerning the American University, we are convinced that substantial progress has been achieved, that a great plan is being carefully wrought

out, and that the prospects for the near future are bright with promise. This University, planted at the Capital of the Nation, for original research, the equipment of professional men, and the training of specialists must be worthy of the American people, and should have our earnest support.

GARRETT BIBLICAL INSTITUTE.

In reporting this Theological School we regret to record the death during the past year of Dr. Ridgway, who rendered for so many years such efficient service as President.

Garrett Biblical Institute has enjoyed a year of great prosperity. The attendance of students has been large, and more and better work is being done than ever before. We commend this School to all our young men who desire a thorough Theological training.

We recommend as Conference Visitors, Dr. C. W. Blodgett and Dr. F. H. Cumming.

NORTHWESTERN UNIVERSITY.

We report with gladness the prosperity of this, the largest of our Western Educational Institutions. The enrollment is very large and is increasing. The endowment has been materially enlarged, and the various departments are striving for the best equipment, and the highest possible results.

The Faculty has been recently increased, and stands fully abreast with the teachers in the foremost Educational Institutions of our country.

We recommend that Rev. J. W. Haney be appointed Conference Trustee.

We regard it as the duty of every pastor to urge the Sunday Schools to observe "Children's Day," by the use of the programs prepared by the Board of Education, and by taking a collection for the Children's Fund, as the Discipline requires, and that such collections be forwarded to the Board of Education. We call attention to the fact that this collection cannot be divided, or any part of it applied to any other purpose.

We are gratified to learn that the Board of Education has aided during the past year 1,539 students; 24 of these are within the bounds of our Conference, and were assisted to the amount of \$1,225, which is more than the entire amount contributed to the Board by this Conference during the year. In view of this fact, we recommend that special effort be made to increase the Children's Day Collection.

We commend the work of the Board of Education in its diligent efforts to raise the standard of requirements for graduation to the baccalaureate degrees, in at least 44 of our Colleges.

We heartily endorse the representatives of those Schools most closely related to this Conference—viz.: The Illinois Wesleyan University, Bloomington; The Grand Prairie Seminary, Onarga; and Hedding College, Abingdon; and we will cheerfully welcome them to our pulpits in the interests of their respective Institutions.

Resolved, That the collections for Education, other than the Children's Fund, be retained for distribution among the three Conference Schools.

Resolved, That the distribution of said funds for the ensuing year shall be as follows:

The collections taken in the Churches, North and East of the following line, shall go to Grand Prairie Seminary, viz: Beginning at Seneca, and following the railroad from Seneca to Garduer; from Garduer to Pontiac; from Pontiac to Gibson City. The collections from the balance of the Conference shall be divided between Hedding College and the Illinois Wesleyan University, upon the basis of the number of licensed preachers coming from within the bounds of this Conference, said licentiatees to be certified by name and residence to the Conference Treasurer, who shall apportion said funds, and said money shall be used for the payment of current expenses.

EPWORTH LEAGUE.

In the organization of the Epworth League, the Church has at last solved the problem as to what shall be done to save our young people to God and the Church.

The bulwark of the Church, as well as the Nation, is her young people; and it was for years a matter of great anxiety as to what could be done to prevent our youth from going out from us. Various Young People's Societies were organized, but none seemed adequate to the demand. Finally, in the order of Providence, the Epworth League, with its various departments, giving activity and employment to the diversified orders of talent among our young people, was instituted six years ago, at Cleveland, Ohio.

So marvelous has been the development of this, the youngest child of the Church, that during the six years of her existence she has grown numerically to the splendid sum of 19,000 chapters, with a membership of a million and a half.

Our own Central Illinois Conference can justly boast of 250 Epworth Leagues, with a membership of 11,782, and 130 Junior Leagues, with 5,860 members—a gain during the year of 14 Epworth Leagues and 1,270 members and 13 Junior Leagues with 960 members.

While we rejoice in the unparalleled growth of this organization, in order that said growth may continue and be substantial, we urgently request every pastor to see to it—

1st. That every League be properly organized, and that every member be earnestly engaged in Christian work.

2d. That the League shall be made to feel that it is an important part of the church, co-operating with it.

3d. That some systematic course of Literary Work shall be pursued in

which the Bible and Doctrines and Discipline of our Church shall have a prominent place.

We look with a sense of just pride upon the unprecedented success of the *Epworth Herald*, with a weekly circulation of 80,000 copies, and we congratulate the Church upon its good fortune to have in its communion a man of so eminent ability for its editor as Dr. J. F. Berry.

No home where there are young people can afford to be without this most excellent paper. Further, in view of the fact that the State Convention fails to attract to its sessions the great mass of our young people, we request the officers of the Conference organization to arrange for a Conference Convention to be held within the bounds of the Conference, about the last of June.

FREEDMAN'S AID AND SOUTHERN EDUCATION SOCIETY.

With gratitude to God we recognize the efficient work done in our beloved Southland by the Freedman's Aid and Southern Education Society in the Christian education and training of the illiterate population, preparing such for more efficient citizenship. For, upon the Christian education of the masses depends largely the perpetuity of our free institutions and welfare of the people. As loyal Methodists we deplore the helpless condition of over five million American citizens in the Southland that cannot even write their own names, and we pledge ourselves to help more than ever to remedy this great evil through this agency (the Freedman's Aid Society), that has done so much in the past and is so full of promise for the future. No better work is being done anywhere than by this society. From its schools hundreds of ministers and thousands of teachers have been sent out to lead their people to a higher and more useful life. During the last twenty-five years over two hundred and fifty Christian physicians have been educated and sent out to make the world better.

During the year 1894-5, notwithstanding the financial crisis through which the country has passed, during which time over 15,000 business men and firms have failed, with losses aggregating over \$200,000,000, this society has maintained and superintended forty-five institutions of learning in our Southland, having enrolled 8,123 students and 459 teachers. The total receipts for the year ending June 30, 1895, were \$284,740 26 Unfortunately there is a decrease in Conference collections. This should be regretted by all.

Resolved, (1) That we co-operate freely with the officers of this Society in carrying out the design of this laudable organization (2) As an annual Conference in the Methodist Episcopal Church we enter our solemn protest against such laws, enacted in any part of the United States that would, in any way have a tendency to hedge up, abridge, or destroy the political or religious liberty of any American citizen.

SANCTITY OF THE SABBATH.

We hail with gladness the evidence of newly-awakened interest in the more careful observance of the Christian Sabbath.

Believing as we do, that history as well as the Book of God teaches that the nation or people who "remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy," secures the Divine blessing and protection, we rejoice in the continued agitation that is being carried on in our country on the Sabbath question, and the advances that are evidenced in municipal reforms, in State enactments, and in the practice of Christian people, that the claims of the Christian Sabbath are being better understood and recognized. We especially commend the efforts of some of our camp-meeting associations to discourage and discountenance Sunday trains on our camp-meeting Sabbaths, and recommend to all our camp-meeting associations that they give no encouragement to railroad corporations to run Sunday trains to our camp grounds.

We also commend the action of one of the great political parties of the State of New York in refusing to give encouragement to the open saloon on the Sabbath, and placing itself squarely on the side of morality and righteousness, by insisting on closing both front doors and back doors on the Sabbath day in conformity to the law of the State and the direction of Almighty God. Therefore,

Resolved, 1st, That we will diligently teach in our Sabbath Schools, in our Epworth Leagues, and from our pulpits, the law of the Fourth Commandment, and by precept and example help preserve the American Sabbath for the American people.

Resolved, 2d, That we will co-operate with all societies and organizations laboring for this end, and recommend to all our members to join with us and them in preserving our Holy Sabbath as a day of rest and holy convocation.

STATE OF THE CHURCH.

Your Committee on the State of the Church respectfully submit the following report:

1. We are profoundly grateful for the continued and abiding presence of the Holy Ghost in the Church, as evidenced by the increasingly large and liberal gifts of our people for the Cause of Christ at home and abroad, by the unflinching steadfastness of our ministry and membership in their adherence to and advocacy of the great reform movements of the day, and by the revival fires that burn on our altars. God has given us a marvelous enlargement of our borders because, as we believe, we have been as a Church in touch with the Divine purpose in uplifting humanity, and in the redemp-

tion of the world. We believe that continued favor with God will alone give us permanent favor with men. If we are untrue to Him, He will raise up a neighbor better than ourselves to do His work.

2. History, both sacred and profane, shows the proper observance of the Sabbath is closely identified with national and individual prosperity. We fear that in some quarters the convictions of our people touching the necessity of a Holy Sabbath are being stealthily undermined by the looser notions of a foreign population around them. As sure as God is true, the Divine favor will not abide with a people who use God's Sabbaths as seasons for pleasuring, visiting, bicycling, trafficking at home or at Camp Meetings, or otherwise turning the Sabbath into a day of recreation, amusement or toil.

3. Likewise we tremble for some among us who would indulge in the questionable amusements, with good reason prohibited in the discipline of the Church, which they have solemnly promised to observe, while at the same time they profess to have renounced the devil and all his works, the vain pomp and glory of the world, with all covetous desires of the same. The Baptismal Covenant and the vows of the Christian Church we believe to be wholly inconsistent with the card table, the theatre or the dance. The widest experience teaches in these matters the truth of Christ's words: "No man can serve two masters." The way of him who indulges in these practices we believe leads away from Christ and the Church. We urge upon all our pastors the necessity of a careful administration of the discipline touching this question, that the work of their successors be not embarrassed and that the Church and the world be not synonymous terms.

4. The convictions of our people, as to their stewardship and their financial obligations in the support of the Gospel are often weakened, we fear, by a system of entertainments, socials, suppers, fairs, festivals, and the like, in which the lower and sometimes doubtful motives are employed to secure the necessary means to carry forward Christian work, instead of those presented in the Word of God. Let all our people be taught their high privileges and obligations in a Christian use of their means, and the Church will not be put to shame by the pitiful attempt to barter oysters for the money that is her due.

5. We earnestly urge all our people to resist any tendency to neglect class and prayer meetings, believing as we do that these social means of grace are the spiritual thermometer by which the religious life of the Church or the individual can be tested.

We fear that in many of our churches there is danger of dividing into two classes, viz: Those who use the social means of grace, and those who do not. We would emphasize the value of personal testimony in the religious life, not only for its helpfulness to others, but for the deepening of personal experience and conviction. "Ye are my witnesses," saith the Lord. The open confession of Christ, humbly and devoutly given, is made in God's word a condition of blessing. Let us not fail so to teach.

6. We hail with delight the tokens of deepening interest in the cause, of Christ as shown by our army of young people, a million and a half strong, enrolled in the Epworth League. The time is at hand for a grand forward movement for the subjugation of the world to Christ. We bid God-speed to those who are endeavoring to solve the difficult problem in city and country,

of reaching the unchurched masses. It is our profound conviction that in no preceding age has there been the intelligence, consecration and activity in Christian work that exists to-day. We believe "Our God is marching on" to the conquest of all hearts to himself.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND TRACTS.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We note with pleasure the fact that we now have in our Church 29,862 Sunday Schools, with 348,685 officers and teachers, and 2,510,539 scholars. These great numbers exhort us to seek the highest intellectual and spiritual preparation for the great work of teaching in the impressible years of early life those committed to our charge.

As the Church Extension Society helps us to build churches in destitute places, and the Missionary Society to support pastors in needy fields, so the Sunday School Union aids in starting and maintaining Sunday Schools.

Three thousand schools were aided during the past year. The Sunday School Union asks \$50,000 with which to carry on its splendid work. The apportioned share of our Conference is \$755. Let us not neglect this collection for the larger ones.

Parents should be urged to help their children in the study of the lessons at home, and be made to feel that the primary responsibility of spiritual guardianship rests upon them.

We urge that the children and youth in our schools be often exhorted to receive Jesus as their personal Saviour, and the fullness of His blessing in the gift of the Holy Ghost.

Only godly men and women should be called to teach in our schools.

TRACTS.

The Lord has put the seal of His favor on the use of the Tract as an evangelizing agency. Wesley made much of the use of Tracts. Wise Methodist preachers do the same now. Our Tract Society is serving our Church well, both in the quality and cheapness of the literature it has to offer. We fear too few of us avail ourselves of the great help the Tract Society is able and willing to be to us in our work. We recommend that our Conference faithfully endeavor to raise the \$755 apportioned to us as our equitable share of the \$50,000 needed.

TEMPERANCE.

In view of the obvious persistent enmity and accumulative power of the legalized liquor traffic, we abandon the usual formalities of "Whereas" and "Resolved," and at once reaffirm our purpose "to wage an increasingly aggressive warfare" against this "unmixed evil," according to the spirit of our Discipline, and the emphatic declarations of our General Conference.

We hold—

1st. That this purpose of our Church to antagonize and finally extermi-

nate the saloon business should be zealously carried out, both by precept and practice; and

2d. That, as ministers, we will preach against this gigantic foe of the home, the Church and the State, and that "we will pronounce most emphatically against any party that in its platform or legislative acts provides by license or otherwise for the continuance of the drink traffic, and 'affords no protection against its ravages:'" and that, in our political affiliations, we will demonstrate to the world "that the only proper attitude for Christians toward this ungodly business," which "can never be legalized without sin," "is that of relentless hostility."

3d. In view of the fact that the coming year is likely to be one of great political agitation, and, as we have reason to believe, that prominent politicians will attempt to ignore all temperance issues and reforms, that we urge our people to assert their rights to be heard on these important questions.

4th. That we accede to the request from various religious and temperance organizations to observe the fourth Sunday of November of each year as "Temperance Sunday," and that, among other things, we will present to our people on that day the action of the General and Annual Conferences on this subject.

5th. That in consideration of the importance of well-defined aggressive temperance work, we request that a time be designated in the program of our annual sessions for a Temperance Anniversary.

6th. That, so soon as it becomes evident to us that we can accomplish more and better work by consolidating our Conference Temperance Society with the organization proposed by the Philadelphia Conference, known as a "Conference Prohibition League," we will heartily unite in what promises to be a more general and better connectional system of warfare against this common foe.

III. Reports of Special Committees.

CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGES.

I. On the Admission of Women to the General Conference, we recommend substantially the action of the Baltimore Conference, as follows:

WHEREAS, The General Conference of 1892, directed the submission to the Annual Conferences in the Autumn of 1895, and the Spring of 1896, of certain resolutions which provide in part, as follows:

"(1st.) That we submit to the Annual Conferences the proposition to amend the Second Restrictive Rule by adding the words, "And such delegates must be male members," after the words, "Two lay delegates from an Annual Conference," so that it will read, "Nor of more than two lay delegates for an Annual Conference, and said delegates must be male members."

* * * * *

(5th.) That if the amendment so submitted does not receive the votes of three-fourths of the members of the Annual Conferences, and two-thirds of the General Conference, the Second Restrictive Rule shall be so construed that the words, "Lay Delegates," may include men and women, and thus be in harmony with the legislation of previous General Conferences;" and,

WHEREAS, This action involves a principle, the application of which is claimed to be without precedent, and without constitutional authority; and,

WHEREAS, The fifth section of said resolutions, requires, "The votes of three-fourths of the members of the Annual Conferences," to enact said proposed amendment: while the Discipline requires, so far as relates to the Annual Conferences, only "the concurrent recommendation of three-fourths of all the members of the several Annual Conferences who shall be present and vote on such recommendation," Therefore be it

Resolved, 1st, that, waiving all question of the expediency of the admission of women to the General Conference, we declare our judgment that such admission should not be secured or sanctioned by any method that wears the suspicion of irregularity or inadequacy.

2nd. That we deem it unwise to vote upon the proposition to amend the Second Restrictive Rule in the manner proposed by the aforesaid action of the General Conference of 1892.

Nevertheless, we recommend that any member of this Conference who desires to vote for or against the proposed amendment, shall have the privilege of doing so in open Conference.

Resolved, 3rd, that we propose the following amendment to the Second Restrictive Rule, to add the words, "And said delegates may be men or women," after the words, "Two lay delegates for an Annual Conference," so that the entire clause will read, "Nor of more than two lay delegates for an Annual Conference, and said delegates may be men or women."

II. On the date of the assembling of the General Conference, we recommend the adoption of the resolutions adopted by the West Wisconsin Conference, Sept. 13th, 1893, as follows:

WHEREAS, For many obvious reasons the first Wednesday of May is preferable to the first day of May for the meeting of the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church; therefore,

Resolved, 1st, that the Bishops presiding in the several Annual Conferences during the year 1894, are hereby respectfully requested to submit to all the Annual Conferences the following proposition, namely:

To amend paragraph 63 of the Discipline of 1892, so that it shall read as follows, to-wit:

¶63. The General Conference shall meet on the first Wednesday of May in the year of our Lord, 1900, and thenceforward on the first Wednesday of May once in four years perpetually, at such hour and in such place in the United States as the General Conference may from time to time direct; but the General Superintendents or a majority of them, by and with the advice of two-thirds of all the Annual Conferences, shall have power to call an extra session of the General Conference, to be constituted in the usual way; but if there shall be no General Superintendents, then two-thirds of all the Annual Conferences shall have power to call such extra session.

Resolved, 2nd, that if the above proposition shall be sustained by a three-fourths vote of the members of the several Annual Conferences present and voting, and shall be further approved by two-thirds of the ensuing General Conference, then and in that case it shall take the place of and shall be held and regarded in all respects as of the same force and virtue as the present said paragraph 63.

Resolved, 3rd, that the Bishops are requested to see that the votes in the several Annual Conferences be taken, canvassed and returns made to the Secretary of the Board of Bishops, and also to the Secretary of the last General Conference, as in similar cases.

Resolved, 4th, that we recommend that the displaced portion of the said paragraph 63 be retained in a suitable foot-note for historical purposes.

PLAN OF EXAMINATIONS.

That we may raise the standard and increase the attainments of our ministry, and at the same time be fair to members of our Conference Classes and conserve the interests of the Church of Christ, your committee respectfully submits the following plan of examinations:

We suggest that the greatest caution shall be exercised in the selection of men to serve on examining committees.

Also that committees annually appointed to examine candidates for Admission on Trial, be continued with the Class, when practicable, throughout the entire four year's course.

A three days' Institute shall be held in the month of April or May, in at least two places in the Conference, in connection with the usual District meetings, where such meetings are held, at which time and place examinations shall be had in the first half of the year's work.

The different Chairmen shall indicate the studies for the first half of the year, and shall give all candidates due notice of the same within thirty days of the adjournment of the Annual Conference.

The Chairmen of the Committees of Examinations, together with the Presiding Elders, shall arrange a program for the Institute, and attendance for the full term shall be required of each Candidate unless excused for good and sufficient reason by the Chairman of his committee.

Examinations on the second half of the work shall be conducted at some central point in each Conference District, on the first Tuesday of August, under the supervision of some member of the Committees of Examination, or Preacher in charge, who shall be designated by the Presiding Elder of the District. The Elder shall also appoint the place of meeting.

All examiners shall attend the Mid-year Institute, if possible, and shall send written questions to the person appointed to supervise the Examinations in August. Not less than 10, nor more than 20 questions shall be submitted in each study, and all answers to the same shall be in writing and all grading shall be on the scale of ten.

No Candidate shall be entitled to advanced classification who has failed to make a grade of seven in two books to be studied, or three books to be read, or in one to be studied, and two to be read, and no Candidate shall be entitled to examination in advanced study until he has brought up all the books in which he is delinquent.

Books to be read shall count equally with books to be studied in establishing a grade.

WESLEY HOSPITAL.

The report of Wesley Hospital for the ten months from Nov. 1, 1894, to Aug. 1, 1895, shows that 231 patients were received and given 5,194 day's care, an average of $24\frac{1}{3}$ days per patient. Of these patients, 95 were cured; 56 improved; 11 unimproved; 18 died; 15 were not treated, and 18 are still in the institution.

On June 15, 1895, Mr. James S. Harvey, a successful business man, of Chicago, was appointed Treasurer and Superintendent. Under his able management the debt has been greatly reduced and is now but \$6,600. The Treasurer has plans by which it is expected that this amount will be paid before the end of the calendar year.

Extensive improvements have been made in the Hospital, and it is now in first-class condition throughout.

This Conference stands pledged to the payment of \$600 per year for the maintenance of two beds in the Hospital. The amount raised last year was but a small part of this amount.

We urge that a special effort be made the coming year to raise the full

\$600, so that the beds may be set apart and named for the Central Illinois Conference. To that end we endorse the plan of the Treasurer for raising money, without public collections, by means of dime albums; and recommend that in each charge a committee be appointed to co-operate with the Pastor in carrying out this plan.

We call the attention of all interested in sending patients to the Hospital, to the fact that full information regarding it can be obtained by addressing the superintendent, Mr. James S. Harvey, corner 25th and Dearborn Streets, Chicago, Ill.

We recommend that Rev. A. M. Stocking and Mr. W. H. McCord be elected as Conference Trustees of the Hospital for the ensuing year.

II. ON LAY DELEGATES. (Submitted by Baltimore Annual Conference, March, 1893, and Colorado Annual Conference, June, 1895.)

Amend the Second Restrictive Rule by adding the words, "And said delegates may be men or women," after the words, "two lay delegates for an Annual Conference," so that the entire clause will read, "Nor of more than two lay delegates for an Annual Conference, and said delegates may be men or women."

III. ON RATIO OF MINISTERIAL REPRESENTATION. (Submitted by Colorado Annual Conference, June, 1895.)

Strike out the words, "forty-five," in the fourth line of Section 2, Paragraph 67, of the Discipline, and insert instead the words, "sixty-five," so that the clause as amended shall read as follows: "The General Conference shall not allow of more than one ministerial representative for every fourteen members of an Annual Conference, nor of a less number than one for every sixty-five."

This certifies that the Central Illinois Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, at its session begun in Peoria, Ill., on the 18th day of Sept., A. D., 1895, voted on the above propositions as follows:

Memoirs.

VALENTINE C. RANDOLPH

Was born in Logan County, Illinois, Feb. 16, 1838, and died in Abingdon, Ill., Jan. 1, 1895, aged 56 years, 10 months and 15 days. He was reared on a farm, and in early life was taught the important lessons of industry, so essential to success in life. In 1857 he entered the preparatory school of the Illinois College at Jacksonville, where he completed his preparation for college. In the fall of 1860 he entered Dickinson College, at Carlisle, Pa. When the slave-holders' rebellion was inaugurated for the overthrow of the Union, his young manhood was aroused, his patriotism was stirred by the insult to our flag, and he, with thousands of other college boys, exchanged the daily round of hard study and recitations for the harder fate of a soldier's life. In 1861 he returned to his native state, entered the volunteer service in the 39th Illinois, and for three full years endured the fatigue of the march, the exposures of the camp and the perils of the battle. He was twice wounded, but not seriously, and with unabated loyalty to the grand old flag, he stood in his place in battle line until the victory was won. The onflow of years did not serve to cool his ardor in the cause of freedom, to diminish his interest in his country's prosperity, to lessen his patriotism, nor to decrease his undying love for his comrades who so bravely periled their lives to stamp out hideous treason. He was exceedingly jealous of the good name and fame of his comrades, and nothing, save a thrust at the church, would so try the urbanity of his quiet nature as an insult offered to the Union soldiers. We honor him for his patriotism, and while admiring other virtues of his heart and life, we would not forget his unswerving loyalty to his country in the hour of his country's peril, nor his unabating patriotism that filled his heart to the end of life. In the fall of 1865 he entered the Ohio Wesleyan University, from which he graduated in the class of '68. A member of the faculty said to me that up to that time he was the best classical scholar that had gone out from that famous institution. He immediately went to Garrett Biblical Institute, from which he graduated with the degree of Bachelor of Divinity in May, 1870. On the 23d of June, the same year, he was united in marriage with Miss Angelina Houghton, of Wellington, Ohio, who remains to mourn the loss of a kind, affectionate husband. The home of Brother and Sister Randolph was a model one, where we always found a warm welcome and a hospitable entertainment. It was a Christian home whose elevating influences were felt by all who entered as its guests. In the fall of 1870, Bro. Randolph, feeling that God had called him to enter the Christian ministry, joined the Illinois Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. For eleven years he labored faithfully and successfully as a pastor in that Conference. In 1881 he was transferred to the Central Tennessee Conference and stationed in the city of Nashville. After two years of faithful service, he was transferred to the Central Illinois Conference, of which he was a loved and honored member at the time of his death. He

served acceptably and successfully the charges to which he was assigned, and in the true spirit of a loyal Methodist preacher he did the work assigned him without complaining. Twice he was offered a position in our church educational work, but not seeing a necessity for his service, he preferred to remain in the pastorate. However, when the dark shadow came over Hedding College, caused by the death of Dr. J. R. Jaques, Bro. Randolph yielded to our importunity and consented to step into the break that death had made. He was scholarly, industrious, painstaking. He constantly grew in the confidence and affection of his students. He was not only scholarly and faithful in his work, but as a member of the Faculty he was considerate and prudent, and his council was uniformly wise. In the very prime of life, suddenly and unexpectedly our friend and brother was taken from us by the relentless hand of death. An active, devoted and useful life suddenly closed. While we cannot comprehend this Providence, we submissively say, "Thy will, O God, be done." We would not call our brother from his place with the angels before the Throne, but with consecrated lives would follow on to join him amid the glories of a blissful immortality.

GEORGE W. MILLER.

Rev. George W. Miller was born in New Albany, Ind., July 14, 1818, and died in Winterset, Ia., May 21, 1895.

Soon after his birth his parents removed to Louisville, Ky., where they resided until he was five years old, when they removed to Lawrenceville, Ill. Nov. 18, 1839, near Lawrenceville, Ill., he was married to Miss Elizabeth Westfall, who, with six children, survive to mourn his death.

After the death of his father, in January, 1840, George took charge of his business and family. In the winter of 1842, in a meeting held by Rev. William Blundell, he received the forgiveness of his sins and the witness of his adoption into the family of God, and immediately united with the Methodist Episcopal Church. So great was his zeal and desire to be useful that soon after being received into full membership he was licensed as an exhorter. In April, 1846, he removed to Knox County, Illinois, and in 1849 was licensed as a local preacher. His parents consecrated him to God in his infancy. God honored their devotion by calling him to the ministry early in his religious life.

Family and business cares prevented him from responding at once, but he continued to do the work of a local preacher, in a manner and spirit that resulted in great good to the church in the, then, sparsely settled part of Illinois.

July 16, 1851, the Rock River Conference met in Peoria Ill., and he was admitted on trial, and appointed to Mackinaw Mission. His subsequent appointments were Chillicothe, two years; Lancaster, two years; Cuba, two years; Blandinsville, two years; Carthage, two years; LaHarpe, two years; Carthage, one year; Brimfield, one year; Canton circuit, two years; Gilson, three years; La Prairie Center, one year; Woodhull, two years; New Windsor, one year; Ellison, one year; Good Hope, two years. Bro. Miller was ordained a Deacon by Bishop Scott in 1853, at Chicago; an Elder by Bishop Janes at Rock Island in 1855.

At the Conference at Fairbury, in 1830, he asked and obtained a superannuated relation, and soon after removed to Winterset, Ia., where he continued to reside until his death. During his residence in Winterset he was active and devoted in Christian work, as opportunity offered and his health would permit, preaching, visiting the sick, comforting the dying and burying the dead. About thirteen years ago he suffered a partial stroke of paralysis. From this he rallied, in a measure, but his health was never fully restored. It was the beginning of the end. Although a great sufferer for years, he kept at work. In January, 1895, he received a severe injury; several surgical operations were performed, and this, with kidney derangement, greatly enfeebled him. The end seemed to have come, but he rallied and once more attended public services, and went home to die.

Two of his old associates in this Conference, Revs. C. Springer and A. R. Morgan, assisted by resident clergymen of other churches, conducted the funeral services and laid him down to rest till the resurrection of the just.

George W. Miller was a manly man; prompt, energetic, courageous. As a Christian, humble, patient, diligent, consistent. As a friend, true and constant. As a preacher, his talents made him useful, rather than brilliant. As a pastor, faithful and loving. As an administrator of discipline, mild but firm. For many years to come his memory over a large part of the Central Illinois Conference will be as "ointment poured forth."

Martha Ann Clark was born in the state of Ohio, Dec 11, 1825. She died at the residence of her son-in-law, Frank Montgomery, in Farmington, Ill., at 2:10 p. m., March 23, 1895, aged 69 years, 3 months and 12 days.

She was married to Rev. James Ferguson, late of the Central Illinois Conference, June 15, 1847, at Canton, Ill. To them eight children were born; three died in infancy. Those who survive are William Haney, who resides at Prairie City, Ill.; James C., of Fremont, Neb.; George O. of Washington, D. C.; W. E., of Fort Worth, Texas; and Lizzie B., wife of Frank Montgomery, of Farmington, Ill., with whom she has had a home since the death of her husband, which occurred December 15, 1889. All the children were present at the funeral except W. E.

Her funeral was held at the home March 25, 1895. The sermon was preached by an old-time friend and former Presiding Elder, Dr. W. H. Hunter, of Peoria; the text chosen was Ecc. 9th chapter, 5th verse, first clause: "For the living know they must die." The pastors of all the churches were present and took part in the service.

Mrs. Ferguson gave her heart to God in her youth and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, and lived and died in that faith.

For the last fourteen years she had been greatly afflicted, not able to walk a step; hands drawn by rheumatism so that she could not write: so deaf, it was difficult to make her hear. But all these afflictions she bore patiently, and always greeted her friends with a cheerful word and pleasant smile. As a wife and mother, she was described by Solomon: "She looked well to the ways of her household, and ate not the bread of idleness; her children rise up and call her blessed, and her husband praised her." For

twenty-eight years she was an itinerant minister's wife. Wherever the Conference assigned them she cheerfully went and faithfully labored to advance the cause of her Redeemer. Her husband's last sickness was protracted and painful. How keenly she felt her inability to minister to his wants. The spirit was willing, but the flesh was weak. The great trial of her life came Dec. 15, 1889, when the dear companion of her youth took his departure to the Spirit Land. Helpless and deaf, with not much of earthly goods, what sorrow she felt, we may imagine, but cannot know, but no complaint was ever heard to pass her lips. Her trust was in God, and her burden she cast upon the Great Burden Bearer.

Her hours of loneliness were spent in meditation, reading and prayer. Since the marriage of her daughter, Lizzie, her home was with her. She had a good home, the comforts of life and the care of a dutiful, loving daughter and the helpfulness and kindness of a son-in-law, whom she dearly loved.

Sister Ferguson was an earnest Christian, a faithful wife, a devoted mother and patient sufferer.

On the 14th day of March she was taken sick with la grippe and the disease hastened rapidly, until 2:10, March 23, her spirit was released. Made perfect, though suffering, she went to her Lord. "For to be absent from the body is to be present with the Lord." The night before she died, about 12 o'clock she lifted her voice in prayer to Him she had so long trusted and faithfully served, and asked him, if consistent with His will, that her release might come quickly. Her son, William, and his wife, were at the bedside. Her prayer closed with eyes uplifted, and with an earnest gaze for some moments, when she cried out, "I know I see my Savior." This vision made her joyful.

Oblivious to all around her, she held sweet communion with Him, who said: "I will not leave you comfortless, but will come again and receive you unto Myself, that where I am, there ye may be also." In answer to her pastor's inquiries, she said the future was bright and Jesus was present and precious. Her son, William, and wife, her daughter, Lizzie, and her husband, was with her in the last conflict. Her daughter, who had ministered to her in all her affliction, was with her when she put on Immortality. Faithful and patient in life she was triumphant in death.

Her remains were laid to rest beside her dear husband in Oakwood cemetery, and their last resting place is marked by a beautiful marble monument erected to their memory by their children.

MRS. T. E. NEWLAND.

Sister Etta A. Newland, whose maiden name was Hankins, was born in Ripley, Brown County, Illinois, December 29, 1869, and was called from earth from the parsonage of the Walnut Grove Charge, Macomb District, Central Illinois Conference, April 19, 1895.

Her childhood was spent in Ripley, and her young womanhood in Tennessee, McDonough County, where she passed through the public schools with honors, indicating future success in literary work. Afterward she con-

tinued her education in the Normal College at Macomb, where she took high rank as a student.

For six years she was a teacher in the public schools of McDonough County, always giving satisfaction to patrons and imparting her many graces to the pupils under her care.

On the 27th of December, 1893, she was united in marriage with Rev. T. E. Newland, a Probationer in the Central Illinois Conference. Being a devoted Christian and a noble woman, she became at once a noble wife and an earnest helpmeet to her husband in his labors of love, which she liberally shared and really enjoyed. Few of the Master's servants have been permitted, in a few short months, to sow beside all waters seed that should be gathered in later years. Sister Newland, for some months before her death, had a presentiment that her race would be a short one, and with true Christian heroism laid all of her energies upon the altar of devotion to her Master and His Church, and when the messenger suddenly came she was ready to go.

After a brief but severe illness of eighteen hours, her spirit was released from the clay tenement and went to the house not made with hands to be

MRS. F. R. BOGCESS.

Cyrena Blakeney, wife of the Rev. F. R. Boguess, was born in Kenawah County, near Charleston, Va., now West Va., November 9th, 1831, and died after a brief illness of hemorrhage of the stomach at her home at Knoxville, Ill., July 14, 1895.

The sixty-four years of her life are so many chapters of a well-written book, all of them sacred, and each holding the attention with an increasing interest to the end. Childhood and youth are beautiful; womanhood, wifehood, motherhood are more beautiful; but the autumn of life with its ripe, golden fruit of the Spirit is the most interesting and beautiful period of life. Only when we begin the descent of the western declivities do we reach the sunny side of life. Then our responsibilities gradually diminish and we lay our burdens down one by one; leisure is afforded for study; faith grows stronger; hope becomes more and more radiant; the pleasures of memory begin to increase; and then the character becomes well rounded, symmetrical, mature. The book of our sister's life therefore closes at its most interesting chapter—just when the grand climax is reached. The story might have been continued; other chapters might have been added, all of them sacred; but none of greater beauty than those that now make up her record. And, besides, we can add nothing more; and we would not, if we could, blot out or in any way mar a single page, or line, or word.

Sister Boguess was converted at the early age of fourteen and lived a consistent Christian life as a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church for fifty years, till called by her Saviour to her home in heaven. What a blessing those years of toil and sacrifice have been to the Church; what a rich reward they will bring to her in the home over there; what a blessed legacy their memory to husband, children, friends.

Early in the winter of 1855-56 she was married to the Rev. F. R. Boguess, then a member of the West Virginia Conference. In 1858 they transferred to the Central Illinois Conference. For forty years she shared the trials and triumphs of the itineracy with her husband, cheerfully adapting herself to the ever-changing circumstances of that mode of life, working faithfully by

his side in the Master's vineyard. During the whole of her lifetime she was active in church work and benevolent enterprises when not prostrated by sickness. As teacher in the Sunday School, as President of the local Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, and of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union she was wise, active, efficient and well-beloved by her associates to the end.

Sister Boggress was the mother of nine children, six of whom survive. Her great work consisted in co-operating with her husband in looking well to the ways of her household and in rearing and educating her children so that they might have the best possible equipment and a fair start for the race of life; her fitting monument is that completed work. For it her children call her blessed, and her husband praiseth her.

Sister Boggress was a modest woman of quiet and dignified manner. In her religious belief she was clear and firm. In her personal testimony joyous but not demonstrative. In her affliction she was calm, resigned and patient, manifesting a fortitude that was remarkable. She had been greatly afflicted during last fall and winter, but when spring came she revived and made a lengthy visit to her daughter at Canton, returning to her home much improved, which gave rise to the hope that she would soon be again restored to complete health. With evident pleasure to herself and to the delight of her pastor and fellow-members she resumed her accustomed place in the services of the sanctuary. On the last Wednesday evening before her death she was present at the prayer meeting and took part in the services. On Friday following she was at a social gathering at the church, entering into the details of the surprise with zest and enjoyment. And thus she spent the day till, between the hours of three and four in the afternoon, feeling some fatigue and a slight illness, she went home. Soon she was taken with a violent hemorrhage; on Saturday many others followed, and on Sunday it was apparent that she was nearing the end. All that love could do was done, but all in vain, she continued to sink rapidly. Husband, children and friends are at her bedside, and in the darkness of that Sabbath night, and in the solemn hush of the death-chamber, love watches the departure of the wife, mother, friend, as eagerly and as tenderly as Elisha watched for the taking away of Elijah, until just as the clock is striking the hour of ten,

She hears the open gate with bleeding feet
And hears life's forces whisper: "We are weary;
Pass on and out; thou canst no more repeat
The golden dreams of youth; and rest is sweet,
And darkness is not dreary

Pass on and out; the way is plain and straight
And countless millions have gone out before thee;
What shouldst thou fear since men of every state
And clime and time have found the open gate,
The gate of death or glory?

Then, fearless, pass down to the silent shore
And look not back with aught like vain regretting;
The sunny days of life for thee are o'er
And thy dark eyes shall hail the light no more;
Thy final sun is setting."

They cease. And through that gate we see her glide,
And down the shore into the dismal river,
That doth the lands of life and death divide,
To find, we trust, upon the farther side
Life, light and love forever.

"O wife! O mother!" were the words in broken accents that greeted our ears when we felt we should see her no more. May a double portion of her spirit be upon her husband and her children. Her death, so calm and beautiful, was like a summer wave gently rippling to the shore.

Appropriate services were held at her home, conducted by the writer assisted by the Revs. W. H. Mason and B. C. Dennis, after which her sons tenderly bore her body away to its last resting place in the Knoxville cemetery.
