IV. JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

WEDNESDAY MORNING, NOV. 14, 1917.

The Fifty-Ninth Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference convened in Hartzel Memorial Methodist Episcopal Church on Wednesday, November 14, 1917, at 9:30 A. M. The Rev. Bishop Edwin Holt Hughes being absent because of delayed railroad connection, the Conference ordered Dr. R. E. Jones to preside. R. W. Winchester read John 15:1-18. The Conference sang hymn 208. W. M. Crawford led in prayer. Dr. S. A. Peeler, assisted by the other three District Superientedents, administered the Lord's Supper.

Rell Call. At the request of the President, Dr. Jones, the assistant secretary, R. N. Brooks, called the roll of members, in full and on trial. 72 of the former answere dand 3 of the latter. The Conference stood in reverent silence while the secretary read the names of C. W. Blaylock, J. C. Robbins, Willis Ellison and Morgan Covington, the deceased brethren. The Conference sang, "Shall we meet beyond the river?"

Organization. Upon the nomination of A. H. Newsome, R. N. Brooks was unanimously elected Secretary. By his nomnation, J. A. Baxter and J. A. Cherry were elected as his assistants.

J. W. Wells was unanimously elected Statistician. He named as his assistants, W. M. Wells, P. I. Wells, D. L. Thomas, and N. M. Black.

P. J. Cook was elected Treasurer and by his nomination A. G. Jenkins, W. T. Lomax, G. W. Morehead, W. R. Zeigler, E. I. S. Swan and A. W. McMaster were elected as his assistants.

Bar. The bar of the Conference was fixed, the reserve area including the first four pews.

Program. The program as printed in the Directory was, by vote of the Conference, made official, including the opening at 8:30 A. M., with half an hour for devotions and adjournment at 12:30 P. M.

Standing Committees. The Standing Committees were read by R. W. Winchester, Secretary of the Cabinet and approved by the Conference.

Dr. Jones then presented the following visitors: Dr. W. A. C. Hughes, of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension; Dr. J. C. Sherrill, of the Board of Foreign Missions; Dr. C. C. Jacobs, of the Board of Sunday Schools; Dr. I. G. Penn, of the Freedmen's Aid Board, and Dr. W. W. Lucas, of the Epworth League.

Publicity Fund. By motion of G. W. Morehead the Publicity Committee was re-appointed. By motion of S. A. Peeler the ministers receiving \$600 and upward for salary are required to pay one dollar each to the Publicity Fund, those receiving less are to pay fifty cents.

Introductions. Prof. R. B. McRary, Corresponding Secretary of the Conference Claimants Pension Fund; Rev. M. Culp, of the Blue Ridge Conference and Dr. J. N. C. Coggins, of the Church Temperance Society, were introduced.

After the usual notices it was voted at 12:45 (the time having been previously extended) to adjourn. The benediction was pronounced by Rev. E. Hatwood, of the A. M. E. Zion Church.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Devotions. The Conference assembled at 2:30 o'clock. Devotions were properly conducted.

Reports. The President ordered the roll called by Districts. This was done by the Secretary, during which roll call many of the brethren reported their statistics. After this Dr. R. E. Jones led the Conference in singing, "I love thy Kingdom Lord."

Pension Fund. Prof. R. B. McRary was presented and represented in a brief address the Conference Claimants' Pension Fund and the General Conference Claimants' Fund at the request of Dr. Hingeley. By motion of J. P. Morris the Secretary was ordered to insert an explanatory paragraph,

affecting the statement in the Journal of 1916 concerning the special collection taken for the Local Conference Claimants' Fund. The statement which appears on page 23 of 1916 Journal, reads as follows: The \$35.00 mentioned on page 23 of the 1916 Journal was included in the \$135.00 turned over to Prof. R. B. McRary and the statement in that Journal that the sum of \$35.00 was turned over to D. Brooks is hereby corrected.

By motion of G. W. Morehead the interest (\$4.00) on the Conference Claimants' Investment Fund was turned over to D. Brooks.

Prof R. B. McRary, on the nomination of R. W. Winchester, was unanimously elected to the position of Field Secretary of the Conference Claimants' Fund in the North Carolina Conference.

Temperance. Dr. J. N. C. Coggins, of the Board of Temperance, represented the Board in a very forceful speech. An offering was taken for Board of Temperance which amounted to \$100.00.

Scott. By motion of R. T. Weatherby the Conference ordered a telegram sent to Mr. Emmett Scott, special assistant to the Secretary of War, assuring him of our utmost confidence in his ability to co-operate fully in the judicious handling of the affairs which that official position imposes.

The house ordered Dr. J. N. C. Coggin to give vouchers for the \$100.00, \$25.00 credit to each District.

Order of Day. Matters affecting our Local Conference Claimants' Fund were made the order of the day for Saturday morning at ten o'clock, by vote of the Conference.

The Conference sang, "Together let us sweetly live." Benediction by Dr. J. N. C. Coggin.

WEDNESDAY EVENING

Introductions, M. M. Jones presiding. Hymn 185 was sung. J. W. Wells led the Conference in prayer. M. M. Jones introduced Prof. Frank Trigg, who represented Ben-

nett College. Dr. I. G. Penn spoke representing the Freedmen's Aid Society.

Dr. R. E. Jones with very fitting remarks introduced Rev. Bishop Edwin Holt Hughes who gave expression of his large faith in Methodism. Announcements.

Benediction by Bishop Hughes.

THURSDAY MORNING

Devotions were conducted by S. F. B. Peace from 8:30 to 9:00 By the request of the Bishop the Secretary read the journal of Wednesday's session, which journal the Conference approved.

The Flag. By motion of R. E. Jones the Publicity Committee was ordered to procure U. S. Flags to be displayed in the church. Conference also ordered each pastor to procure a flag for his church.

Dr. R. E. Jones in a brief, though strong address recounted the history of the Negroes' loyalty to the flag, after which the Conference joined heartily in singing "America."

Book Concern. Mr. W. C. Price, of the Methodist Book Concern, was introduced and made brief remarks touching the work of the Book Concern.

V. REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

GREENSBORO DISTRICT

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

We are again thankful to God for His care of us during another Conference year. We have not lost a man from our ranks this year on account of death. We have been blessed to have only two deaths in the families of our ministers on the district. Death entered the homes of Rev. R. J. Shipp and Rev. G. W. Brower and took for his prize their little daughter and son and wafted them away to glory; but our ranks have been invaded otherwise. Three of our brethren from our district have been called to other religious duties. We will make mention of their work later.

We started out from last Conference to make this year the best year in the history of the work, but the cost of living and an exodus of our people somewhat retarded our progress and at some points placed a halt on our plans. We think, however, that we have done fairly well regardless of the stringent conditions that confronted us.

MidYear Meetings

Usually we have two mid-year conferences, the district conference and the Sunday school and Epworth League convention. We held our district conference as usual and the straw vote there pointed to a good benevolent report at this conference. The reports of the pastors will tell just how near the goal we are. We started out from last conference to surpass in the benevolent and spiritual lines the reports we made there. Nearly every pastor pledged to do his best. Some have kept the pledge and their reports will show a considerable increase over last year. Others may not do so well. We had with us in our district conference Dr. W. A. C. Hughes who ably and forcefully represented the Home Mission and Church Extension work. He gave inspiration to us all and I am sure that the cause was advanced because of his presence and able talks.

We were sorry that Dr. C. C. Jacobs did not give us his usual presence and forceful advices along the line of Sunday school work. Since he has been in the field the Sunday school work of the State has advanced at least 50 per cent, especially in collections.

The Southwestern Christian Advocate was represented by Prof. E. L. Gordon who presented the cause in his unique way and made for the paper many determined friends.

Our spiritual interests were represented by our ministerial

brethren of the district and Rev. H. L. Ashe of the Winston District, who created no small stir spiritually in our conference.

Our other convention was called off because of the great Educational Convention that was held on our district for the entire conference at Bennett College. This convention which was a pre-eminent success was represented by the entire conference and did much toward improving our conference educational work. Our district was enthusiastic to the highest extent and showed its loyalty to Bennett College, the Southwestern Christian Advocate and all the causes there represented. Our vouchers will show at least \$250 for local education at Bennett College.

Educational Work

Our conference school, Bennett College, is located at Greensboro, the center of educational work of the state for both white and colored. We have there much to do to compete with other educational institutions of the vicinity. But it seems that we are holding our own, yea, we are advancing. Dr. Frank Trigg is now at the helm conducting the ship with a load of nearly three hundred students. He has an able faculty to help him. Some of the most brilliant intellect from this and other states are on his faculty and all together are moving the educational work of our church rapidly on.

The Kent Home

Operating in connection with Bennett College is one of the many prosperous institutions erected for the purpose of training our girls for higher usefulness by the Woman's Home Missionary Society. There are in Kent Home 43 girls under the very excellent principal Mrs. Donaldson and her efficient co-workers. On the whole our educational work at Bennett College was never in better condition. Allen Home at Asheville as well as Kent Home is well patronized by our district.

Materialities

There are several points on the district that are making rapid strides materially. Probably the foremost in this respect is Reidsville. Under the direction of brother J. W. Wells this point has improved the entire surroundings to the amount of \$2,500. The delapidated parsonage was renovated to the amount of \$300. This includes plumbing and painting. The church has been veneered with beautiful red brick, making an appearance of a solid brick

church and the inside has been remodeled and reseated with the best of oak seats from Maryland.

At Pleasant Ridge, Va., there has been a new church completed at a cost of about \$1,800, and new pews placed in it. The sum of \$1,600 has been raised and paid on it, leaving a very small balance of \$200. Rev. J. H. Dickens is the ardent worker at this point.

Norfolk, Va., is fast wiping out an old indebtedness of \$800. Rev. Wm. Chavis has managed the affairs at this point to a decided success.

Northwest Greensboro has started to build a new brick veneered church at M'Carmal, a very desirable point on the Battle Ground Drive. U. S. has planned to make the Guilford Battle Ground one of the beautiful historic spots of the nation. We fortunately have a lot just out of the corporation of Greensboro and near the Battle Ground. A prosperous organization has been there for years. They are now aroused by the zeal of Rev. W. T. Lomax, their pastor, and have raised \$200 toward their new church and have it in the bank for that purpose.

East Greensboro has decided also to repair and veneer the church at Browning Chapel. Rev. M. C. Laughlin has faithfully conducted the affairs at this point and they have now on hand several dollars toward the aim in view.

St. Matthews, Greensboro, under the faithful management of Dr. R. T. Weatherby, is reducing her indebtedness at the rate of a thousand dollars a year, besides she is constantly making improvements for which she is paying cash.

Burlington, under the Rev. J. M. Aldridge is about clear of debt. There is a small balance yet which will be looked after immediately after conference.

Empire, under the management of Rev. R. J. Shipp, has done a good work in that she bought and paid for 16 acres of land adjoining the church lands. The purchased land is for parsonage and school purposes. This is one of the prosperous country places owned almost entirely by our people. There are 50 families belonging to this charge owning their own farms, total acres owned by them amounting to 2,500; an average of 50 acres to the family. They deserve a progressive pastor such as is brother Shipp. They also need a good educator to take charge of their school work.

High Street and Raleigh's: High Street is rapidly sliding from under a heavy load that it has been carrying for years. Brother S. F. B. Peace has proven adequate to the task and has led his ever-growing flock a long way on the road to complete success. No better man for business and progress can be found in our ranks.

Oxford under the care of Rev. J. A. Baxter, one of our good

young men, has enlarged her lot fronting the Main Street of the city 17 feet which allows enough room for both church and parsonage to front the popular avenue.

These are the points that have made material progress this year to a noticable degree.

Other Advances

Brown-Summit has made excellent advancement in many lines. Rev. G. W. Brower has determined to do his best on this work, the result is growth both spiritually and in rank as an appointment in the conference. There was a revival held on this work which resulted in many conversions and accessions.

South Greensboro has done well this year both in benevolences and in spiritual revivals. Rev. G. W. Boyers is much loved by the people because of his deep piety and staunch character.

Leaksville is a prosperous town in which our church is happily located. We are on the hill in the midst of a fine people of the other race who edlight to attend church and worship with us at times. The Sunday school here is running on the graded system entirely and is doing a good work. The Rev. R. G. Morris, pastor, was called to Camp Jackson to do religious work for the Y. M. C. A. The people were loth to give him up but finally consented because they knew that our soldier boys needed just such a man as he to advise them in their willingness and effort to save our country and the world for democracy.

Townsville and Bullock circuit is enjoying quite a happy year with brother Marcus Mundy. They are glad to have with them a joyous, bright and happy Mundy with them every day in the week. Brother Mundy has done a good spirituol years work and its effect is seen in the general religious growth of his patrons.

Wentworth and Settles had good revivals this year. Brother J. H. Garrett has done well there. Our people are not as numerous in this section but the few who are there must be looked after. Brother Garrett is the man to do the job.

West Raleigh was pastored the greater portion of the year by Rev. Gilbert Haven Caldwell who was doing well and was well favored among his people. On September 9th he resigned his work by consent of his district superintendent and people and entered Syracuse University for the purpose of better preparing himself for more efficient work in God's Kingdom. Brother L. B. Gibson, one of our honored superannuates took charge of that work and made quite a success. Having a revival in which many souls were added to the church.

Central Randolph, Durham, Forshee, South-ast and Sotuhwest

Greensboro, Henderson, Julian and Ramseur have held their own under adverse conditions. They are small points but difficult to pastor.

Special Causes. Temperance cause has made great progress for these few years and now we can boast of the part our preachers took in helping to bring about this better state of affairs.

The Epworth League is doing well in many of our charges and our young people are taking to hard but pleasant work for the community and for God's Kingdom.

Our Finances are in some points taking on the pure disciplinary method and are ahead of the old way. There are five points on this district that are using the plan laid down by the discipline and these points are ahead in their collections.

Our Laity. The laity are aroused to their special duties. They are realizing more and more that they are an important part of the church and if the church is a success they know that it is largely due to them and they know also that if the church fails it is their loss. We recognize that we must first be intelligent laymen before we are intelligent and successful preachers. Therefore, we are striving to capture the boys and girls in our Sunday schools and Epworth Leagues, knowing that thereby, ere long, we will have both intelligent pew and pastor.

Conference Claimants. It is hoped that our plans for Conference Claimants will be carried out. In truth it must be, if we are to keep pace with the other conferences of our Methodism. The pastors on our conference are beginning to wake up to the importance of this matter. We think that there is no cause that should have more prominence among a body of poor Methodist preachers than this one.

Evangelism. This special phase of our work has not been neglected this year, for after all the foremost work and the supreme duty of the church of God is to save men and women. We have had good revivals this year on the account of which many have heen born into the kingdom. We rejoice that the brethren went into the highways and hedges and compelled them to come in.

One cannot hope to give a full survey of the work of a district in so brief a report. We hope, however, that you have an idea of the work done by us this year. It would take a good size volume to give you the full history and condition of district together with the needs and character of the work done at the different points this year.

Our Honored Brethren. We are delighted to honor our fathers in the work who yet are noble examples for us. Whenever they can they assist us in our work and the assistance rendered is always acceptable to the people. These honored brethren are, L. B. Gibson, L. W. Thomas, J. H. Hunter and Charles Wesley Blaylock, who have been stationed on high by the appointment of the Bishop who renders the final decision in giving us a place throughout the eternities to come.

WESTERN DISTRICT

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

Through the providence of our heavenly Father, I am permitted to present to you, this my fifth annual report of the Western District. This has been a year of much trial and much sorrow with us on the district. We have had a great deal of sickness among the pastors and their families. Two of our leading pastors died during the year, namely, W. Ellison, Mar. 28; J. C. Robbins, July 8. R. B. Rhyne was unable to attend his work for quite awhile; R. Smith's horse threw hi mfrom his buggy and he was seriously hurt. D. L. Thomas suffered a broken arm, but by the help of Him that never faileth, we have been able to keep the work going.

The men have worked hard and have proven themselves faithful and devoted to the cause of the Master. We have spared neither time nor pains in trying to make improvement along all lines. We have been on the field late and early with the sick, the dead of our postors and their families. Yet we are thankful to say that the Lord of Hosts has been with us. The District is, in splendid condition along all lines. Reports from the various charges will put the district in advance of last year, notwithstanding many of our people have left the state in search of work and better wages.

Convention

Our Sunday school and Epworth League convention convened in Marion May 27-30, which was well attended and much good accomplished. It was our endeavor to create sentiment and to stir both old and young to greater activities in the Sunday schools and Epworth League work. Our greatest need is better prepared workers in both the Sunday schools and Epworth League. We have urged the pastors to seek for those who are to work along this line for we fear that we as ministers are not giving the time to this work as we should. I have noticed where the pastors look after the Sunday schools and Epworth League they are alive and many of them are giving aid to the church.

District Conference

The District Conference was held at Bessemer City, July 28. This was a record breaker, every charge reporting but one.

A grand rally was on for Bennett College and at the roll call \$150 was reported reaised, as part of the \$250 apportioned to the District for the College. Pledges were then made by the pastors' to raise the remaining \$100 by the August convention.

Visitors

Among those present with us was Dr. Martin of Gammon, who is always welcome in our midst. He made our hearts burn while he spoke on the great need of a better prepared ministry.

We were also pleased to have Prof. Gordon, our business manager of the Southwestern Christian Advocate, who presented his cause in a most able manner. Sixty-two subscribers were secured.

The conference passed a resolution indorsing Dr. R. E. Jones, editor, for the able manner in which he defends his people. Also for the position he now holds and the stand he has taken on Unification, pleading for all people that they may have a fair deal at least in the church of God. The district is for unification on the Bible plan, as, "Do unto all men as you would have them do unto you."

The Forward Movement and Educational Convention was held at Greensboro, N. C., August 8-12. This was a great meeting which gave inspiration and created much enthusiasm for Bennett College and the Southwestern Christian Advocate. At the roll call, Prof. Frank Trigg was presented with \$250 for Bennett College by the District Superintendent.

We are sorry we were not able to bring up our share of subscribers for the Southwestern. Some have been secured since and we are determined that more shall follow till the district shall have reached the mark.

Education

We are giving much time and thought to this important subject. We have plead with those who have this cause in hand for better equipped school buildings and better prepared teachers. We have stated to many of the teachers, who are fully prepared for school work and are turning their attention to other directions for a livelihood, that they would do God and the race a great service, if they would make the sacrifice to teach though the salary be small, rather than leave the training of the youth to the incompetent teacher.

Bennett College

I have spoken for the school in all of our churches and all places where I have had an opportunity to do so. I have urged our people to send their girls and boys to our school and I am proud to say that the Western district is turning her attention this way; not only in students but money as well. The life of the school is vory largely in our hands, and as for one I shall ever do what I can to keep her living, growing and prospering.

Douglas Academy

Located on the Western District is doing splendid work. Brother J. A. Cherry, the new principal, has started off well. The prospect is good for another year. We are sure if proper care is given this school it will be a great feeder for Bennett College.

Allen Industrial Home

This school, under the auspices of the Woman's Home Missionary Society, opened this fall with great hope and promise for a splendid years work. This school is doing much good for our young people in western N. C., and should have the support of the conference. The Deaconess Home under the leadership of Miss Miner is starting off well. We believe great good will result from the work done by those who have the home in charge.

Kent Home

We have spoken of the work done in the Home and have urged our people to send their girls there for training. We recommend Kent Home to all our people as a proper place for the training of their girls for life's work.

Dear Bishop and Brethren: Permit me to say that we have labored to do our best. We have made some advance and have had the support of a faithful set of brethren, who have stood by us in the hottest of the battle. While it has been hard for some to stay on the field, they have stood the test and none but the tried and true can stand, being led by the Prince of Peace, they are here to report the work done by them in the name fo the Lord, with the exception of Brothers Willis Ellison and J. C. Robbins, who have reported on high.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

For the Wilmington District this has been a year of great pros-

perity. The district covers the eastern and southeastern parts of the State. By far the largest industry of this section is agriculture. Farms have yielded abundant harvests this season and the prices for produce have been unusually good. We have done what we could to direct the people to use their money to the best advantage of themselves, their country and the church. We have endeavored to show them that it is to their advantage, since they look to the preachers for leadership, to give the preachers better support that they may be more independent from a financial standpoint, as poverty unfits for leadership.

We have been earnestly pleading with our people to buy land and to make homes for themselves and many are following our advice where it is possible for them to purchase real estate I am sorry to relate that there are large areas in which it is not possible for Negroes to purchase land, on account of race prejudice. Whenever the opportunity is afforded I have been quick to use it to show to both races that it is better for all concerned not only to allow, but to encourage the Negroes to get homes. In my judgment home-getting and home-making will do more to solve the race problem than will special legislation, segration and mobocracy. The superiority in the life and citizenship of home owners may be easily discerned for the most part. The patriotism of the Negro, although larger than might reasonably be expected under existing circumstances will be greatly enlarged when more Negroes are permitted to own their homes. The man who owns the little spot where he lives and loves it, will for that reason love more the country which makes this ownership possible, and he becomes a more desirable citizen and neighbor.

The Negroe's eyes need to be opened wider upon the field of his advantage among his southern white friends and the friendship and sympathy of the white man should be coveted earnestly and dilgently sought. In this matter our church helps much. For the betterment of this area a good understanding and larger co-operation on the part of both races would work wonders. Profit sharing in the farm industry as well as in the other industries of the South would revolutionize our entire system and do much to keep at home the labor that we so much need, and which for industrial reasons is leaving this territory. This district has suffered much from the exodus of the Negro to the North for the past few years. In some places whole classes left the church. On one of the charges only two men and a few women were left.

Incidental to accepting an invitation to deliver the closing address to the Negro Public School at Red Springs last May, there came to me the rare opportunity of presenting to the 300 students

of the Flora McDonald College for white girls some of the problems which I meet in my work. I have never had a more attentive and appreciative audience. Keenly conscious of the responsibility thrust upon me for an hour and of the value of the time allotted me to speak and certainly, too, apprehensive that some wrong word might be uttered, I possibly said too little, but I did my best to state the problems in a manner that might prove helpful to all concerned.

The health of the preachers has been good and the work of the parishes has gone on well. About all the pastors preached the sermon on education and presented the benevolent causes, taking collections as required by the Discipline. Good revivals were had on all charges and many were saved and added to the church. I have noted with interest that the pastors preached special sermons to the children oftener than formerly and there are signs of progress in the Sunday Schools and young people's department of church work. Pastoral labors have been more abundant and the co-operative spirit resulting therefrom may be easily seen in the unusually large number of requests for pastors to be returned. The number of visits made are nearly double that of previous years. We report with pleasure that pastors and people are devotedly and earnestly working for the success of the church as we have not before realized.

We have a large number of students at Bennett College and would send more if the College could make room for them. We are raising money for the school and both pastors and people are endeavoring to do their duty by every educational interest. We have a few students attending Allen Industrial Home in Asheville.

Improvements have been made on several of the churches at a few places. New buildings are now being erected at the following charges: Hamlet and Philadelphia, at Rockingham; Hoffman and Sand Hills, at Sand Hills; Sanford circuit, at Mt. Olive. Nearly all the church property is properly deeded to the Methodist Episcopal Church and is free from debt. On two charges our property is seriously involved. At Kinston there was an effort made by some parties alien to our church to take possession of our property in our absence. A long law suit resulted, ending in the Supreme Court's deciding for the church. Title to the property is yet in us but it is shadowed by attorney's fee, \$250, and street taxes amounting to \$289. At New Bern our church building has about rotted, and our membership has depleted to the point that none can be found. My opinion is that the property at New Bern and at Kinston would better be sold and the money used to help needy points where we have more hopeful prospects for growth. The church at Wilmington lapsed in the Building and Loan Association and in order to prevent the sale of our property I was forced to buy the Association's claim. I have had difficulty in getting a pastor to supply this charge. The fourth man who attempted it is now doing the work satisfactorily.

Three of the retired ministers reside on this district and they are yet strong physically and morally. They serve acceptably the churches and communities where they live. We trust they will be late in their home-going.

The District Conference met at Red Springs in July and was fairly well attended. Dr. D. D. Martin represented Gammon Theological Seminary and he brought to us a very helpful and instructive message.

Rev. R. G. Morris of the Greensboro District delivered an address on the work of the Sunday Schools and made a plea for the Forward Movement Convention.

On the whole the district is in a prosperous condition and we are hopeful that larger growth may attend our labors in the future.

WINSTON DISTRICT

Most esteemed President, dearly beloved members and co-workers of the North Carolina Conference, grace, mercy and truth be multiplied upon you in abundance. We hail you with affectionate greetings and Christian salutation. It is extremely gratifying to me under the auspices of the Most High to render my fifth annual report of the Winston District, N. C. Conference Methodist Episcopal church. This is a district because of the magnanimous deeds and achievements that we may report with mounted pride. Situated in a section of N. C. and Va., where one can boast of climatic comforts, manufacturing, industry and agricultural pursuits claims for her an ideal location.

The District Conference

The district conference was one of unusual interest and success. Convening in Winston, May's Chapel, where no pains were spared to secure the best of entertainment, and the newly constructed edifice gave tone and expression to the occasion.

In connection with the disciplinary work which was carried out in full, a select number of talented men and women read essays and delivered addresses on the vital topics of the day with much force and power. Representative men of the church were there in persons of Drs. J. N. C. Coggins, pleading with Philippie elo-

quence for a nation-wide prohibition; W. A. C. Hughes, full of information pertaining to Home Missions and Church Extersion, eloquently imparted the same; Prof. E. L. Gordon, business manager of the Southwestern Christian Advocate contended for a more loyal and liberal support for this church organ. Many visitors of note graced the conference.

The Educational and Forward Movement Convention

In the main this was an educational convention yet many features were discussed and much help and information derived.

Financially it was a success, the Winston District leading. Literally it was one continuous gem of thought. Spiritually all felt that it was good for us to be there because of the grace and inspiration received. This convention was made possible by a commission appointed at our last Annual Conference. Obeying the behest of the Conference the results were gratifying.

Epworth League and Sunday School Convention

There is an intense activity in this organization. The patrons of Thomasville deserve much credit for the manner of entertainment. The interest was great, the attendance large as well as representative, and the program reflected credit upon both speakers and the occasion. \$22.50 was given to Bennett College in completing our pledge, in seating a class-room.

The Membership

The membership has held its own as to members. In fact reports will show an increase. We have striven hard amid the afflux of migration to maintain our record. We have place great emphasis on the membership roll, with a view of the fact; that a decrease in membership is the first sign of a decrease in everything else.

Church Law and Doctrine

We have advised, pleaded and exhorted our people to be Church abiding members, as well as national abiding citizens. Our church law should stand for more than it does with some of our members and in some instances our pastors. The law has no place in many of our members polity when the law means restraint. I contend that age has carried none of the fundamentals of truths away, and that the Wesleyan Doctrine is as firm today, as when he sat in the University of Oxford and wrote them as God ordered. We should obey our church laws and doctrines. The order of worship in many of our churches is not at all Methodists.

I do not oppose the creed of any evangelical church; but I do contend, if we are Methodists, use our own form of worship; and let other denominations with credit do likewise. We weaken in proportion as we fall in law and doctrine of the church. We rise in proportion as we foster and maintain the same.

Church Property

There is no material activity of the Winston District, that more interest has been manifested, than in securing and improving church property. We say with modesty, yet truthfully, that we lead the conference in commodious churches.

Ministerial Support

There is no item pertaining to church matters that involves more discussion at present than this one. The high cost of living, increased taxation and the migration of the people have made this quite a serious proposition in some sections of our territory. Many ministers are asked to serve a charge for practically the same he received five years ago. The plea of many of the estimating committees is that every thing is so high we can't justify ourselves by increasing the minister's support. The committee seems to forget that the pastor has astounding increased obligations which must be met, or else embarrass himself and the church. Many of our ministers are forced to menial occupation in order to augment their salary. We have urged the most rigid economy in our support in order to advise others in this crisis of war and food conservation, yet with the most rigid economy no man can live comfortably on former salaries paid by the average congregation of this conference. There must be an increase either in salaries or in dcbt. I advise the ministers to be discrete in the management of money and deportment in order to have a more united effort in securing support. e. g. A poor laundry woman came down the street of a certain town, and saw the minister's children all dressed up and going to the "Movies" as they are called. She immediately said, "I am not able to pay my obligation to my home and the church, and go to the movies; and if the minister is able to do it, he can live without my money, for he is more able than I." This old lady spoke the sentiment of thousands. While every minister has a right to spend his money to suit himself, he should maintain the confidence of his congregation. And if eating meat offends our brother; even though we like it, it is Scripture to "eat no more."

The Church and the War

The war as it is related to the Winston District will be observed in the attitude taken by the district in bonds. We did not pray for this war to come upon us, but since it has come we are praying that we may under the guidance of the Prince of Peace be loyal to the government in conformity with our church and creed, until the Kaiser and his host are driven from the battle field, and their swords shall be beaten into plow-shares and their spears into pruning hooks. Many of us have tken out Liberty Bonds to support our sons and comrades in the trenches.

Benevolent Boards

Special efforts have been made to promote the interests of Foreign Missions, Home Missions and Church Extension, Freedmen's Aid, Education, Sunday School, Conference Claimants, Epworth League Chapters, Methodist Brotherhood, Temperance, Book Concern and our church publications. While these worthy causes have not had the ready support we so much desired, yet every cause to the best of our ability and opportunity has been fostered and helped. We see daily the great need of Home Missions and Church Extension work, Educational and Sunday School activity. We also see to our pain and sorrow the great need of Conference Claimants, as these old veterans of the cross; yea, fathers of our conference, sit waiting the action of the conference for food and clothing. We read with interest and respond as best we may to the great Macadonian cry beyond the seas come over and help us. It has, Mr. President, been urged, even pressed, upon our people that religion is only active in proportion as the great benevolent spirit swings into play in behalf of God and humanity.

The Opportunity

This is an age of migration as well as war, especially so with Negroes. The reason for this great exodus is left for you to solve; yet the fact remains. But as our people drift into these great cities, we should send on trail a messenger or message to our connection in the various cities and localities. This I have tried to do. Again there is neglected territory that ought to be looked after. There are many persons in secluded places on the Winston District, who are neglected because there is no church in reach of them.

We cannot send the gospel to them for lack of men and money. Oh! the dirth for suitable men for this conference, within a few years, unless we who are interested in the conference rise to our duty and opportunity in securing young men for the ministry.

Many a young man today is standing at the door of the ministry, bashful, timid and mixed in thought and ways, with but little encouragement to enter the ministry. We need to see and speak to such young men. God calls men, more or less through men. I have searched the district for suitable young men for the ministry. They are at Bennett College and other institutions or learning.

Our Institutions

We have never worked harder for the promotion of our institutions than the last conference year. And as we see results that fill us with pride and admiration. The slogan this year has been "more money and more students." We got both. Prof. Frank Trigg is doing his best to maintain and promote the interests and reputation of this great institution.

Mr. Chairman, we believe in education at whatever cost or condition. Whatever friction we may have pertaining to educational adjustments in the final analysis with us it is education. Might may over-rule right; but one essential point is to know that it is wrong. We know that truth is not forever on the scaffold and wrong on the throne but in due time right will win.

The Retired Ministers

A number of these honored veterans of the cross reside on the Winston District. Brother S. M. Hanes resides at Winston, feeble in health but strong in the faith of a Crucified Redeemer. Brother F. L. Bost at Kernersville, excellent in health and active in church work. Brother E. Howard at Asheboro, unable in health to care for himself at times, but graciously awaiting the summon from on high. Brother W. E. Pryor at High Point, plodding upward toward the mark of high calling in Christ Jesus. Brother D. Brooks also at High Point, magnanimous in influence, graceful in carriage, commanding the respect of the town but faithfully awaiting the Master's call.

While they remain with us giving tone and dignity to our conference, may the birds of note sing their sweetest melodies over their doors, the sunshine of cheerfulness content their feeble mind, and heaven pour out her richest blessings of gratitude and mercy upon these our sainted fathers.

To Bishop Hughes: Words are inadequate and linguistic gift insufficient to express our appreciation of having you grace our conference as president. You come bearing the reputation of one among the most brilliant sons of Methodism, made possible largely by that illustrious father of yours who recently took his heavenly
