WEDNESDAY MORNING, November 12, 1919.

Opening—The **Sixty-First** Session of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church met in Morris Chapel Church, High Point, N. C., A. H. Newsome Pastor, Wednesday morning, November 12, 1919, at nine o'clock A. M. Bishop Frank M. Bristol assisted by the four District Superintendents administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. At the close of this service, Bishop Bristol made an opening address to the Conference.

Organization. The Conference organized with G. H. Caldwell, Secretary; J. A. Baxter, R. N. Brooks, W. E. Hairston, Assistant Secretaries; R. W. Winchester, Treasurer; W. T. Lomax, G. W. Morehead, W. R. Zeigler, D. L. Thomas, A. W. McMaster, R. B. Rhyne, R. G. Morris, Assistant Treasurers;

Bar of Conference. The bar of the Conference was made to include the first seven seats from the chancel.

Sessions. On motion of A. H. Newsome, nine o'clock A. M. was made the hour for opening business session, and twelve o'clock noon for adjournment. On motion of R. E. Jones, the Conference ordered business suspended at ten thirty in the morning for devotions, and the Bishop's daily address.

Post Master. A. H. Newsome, Pastor of the Church was made Conference Post Master.

Lay Electoral Conference. On motion of R. E. Jones, the Lay Electoral Conference was invited to meet with the Conference in joint session Friday afternoon.

Standing Committees. The standing Committees were nominated by the Secretary of the Cabinet, and elected by the Conference. (See standing Committees).

Southwestern. G. M. Phelps was elected reporter to the Southwestern Christian Advocate.

Question Fourteen. Was the character of each Preacher examined? was called; J. P. Morris, District Superintendent of the Greensboro District, passed in character, and reported the work of his District.

The Effective Elders of the Greensboro District passed in character, and each of them reported his work, except William Chavis who was absent at the time. His District Superintendent represented him.

S. A. Peeler, District Superintendent of the Wilmington District, passed in character, and reported his work on the District.

Each of the Effective Elders of the Wilmington District, except J. D. Murphy, passed in character. All who passed in character reported their work except R. D. Bathea and J. W. Simpson who were absent at the time. Their work was presented by the District Superintendent. The case of J. D. Murphy was referred to the Committee on Qualifications for further actions.

P. J. Cook, District Superintendent of the Winston District passed in character, and reported the work of the District.

The Effective Elders of the Winston District passed in character, and each of them reported his work.

J. A. Laughlin, District Superintendent of the Western

were continued on trial, and advanced to the Studies of the Second Year.

N. M. Martin passed in character, was admitted into full membership, placed in the Studies of the Third Year, and elected to Deacons Orders.

Question Five. Who have been received on Trial? was called.

J. H. Isham and A. S. McGowans passed in character, were received on Trial, and placed in the Studies of the First Year.

Resolution. H. L. Ashe presented a resolution with regard to a more adequate distribution of the proceeds of the Book Concern. The resolution was adopted. (See Resolutions).

R. W. Winchester presented a resolution with regard to examination of candidates entering the ministry. The resolution was adopted. (See Resolutions).

R. G. Morris presented a resolution memorializing the General Conference to make some expression against the practise of Lynching in this country. The wording was corrected and revised and adopted. (See Resolutions).

H. L. Ashe presented a resolution pertaining to the efficient work of the General Superintendent of the Chattanooga Area—Bishop Frank M. Bristol. The Conference stood unanimously in adopting the resolution.

Election of Delegates. The Order of the Day for election of delegates to the General Conference was announced by Bishop Bristol. R. B. Rhyne of the Western District; M. M. Jones of the Wilmington District; J. J. Blanton of the Winston District; W. T. Lomax of the Greensboro District, and W. R. Zeigler at large were appointed tellers. The Assistant Secretary was asked to retire with the tellers and record the vote. The first ballot was taken and the tellers retired.

Introductions. Miss Grace McCormick, Field Secretary of the W. H. M. Society; Dr. J. W. E. Bowen, Vice President of Gammon Theological Seminary; Dr. J. W. Chavis, District Superintendent of the Cumberland River District of the East Tennessee Conference; Dr. J. H. Ellis, District Superintendent of the Nashville District, East Tennessee Conference were introduced.

Miss McCormick and Dr. Bowen made addresses to the Conference.

Tellers Report. Bishop Bristol announced the result of

THIRD DAY

FRIDAY AFTERNOON, November 14, 1919

Devotions were conducted by N. S. T. Shambourger.

Joint Session. Pursuant to previous orders, the North Carolina Annual Conference, the Lay Electoral Conference, and the North Carolina Laymen's Association met in joint session.

Bishop Bristol presented R. B. McRary and W. B. Windsor Lay Delegates Elect; R. E. Jones and R. W. Winchester, Ministerial Delegates elect to the ensuing General Conference, each of whom made address.

Bishop Bristol here presented R. B. McRary, President of the North Carolina Laymen's Association, and requested that he preside jointly with Bishop Bristol at this session.

Bennett College. A very splendid program featuring the work at Bennett College was rendered to the delight of all. Among the numbers was an address by President Frank Trigg, and several selections by the Bennett Musical Club.

A Collection of TWO HUNDRED AND SIXTEEN DOLLARS was lifted for equipment for a physical laboratory for the College.

Adjournment. The session adjourned with the Benediction.

FOURTH DAY

SATURDAY MORNING, November 15, 1919

Devotions were conducted by W. W. Pope.

Journal. The Journal of the previous sessions was read, and approved with corrections.

Question Seven. Who have been Discontinued? was called. None.

Question Twelve. What others have been elected and Ordained Deacons? was called. None.

Question Thirteen. What others have been elected and Ordained Elders? was called. None.

Question Twenty. Who have been permitted to withdraw under Charges or Complaints? was called. None.

Question Twenty-One. Who have been expelled? was called. None.

Question Twenty-Five. Who are the Triers of Appeals? was called.

Robert Smith, A. H. Newsome, H. L. Ashe, W. T. Lomax were elected Tirers of Appeals. N. M. Black and R. B. Rhyne were elected Reserves.

A Collection of SIXTEEN DOLLARS AND THIRTY-FIVE CENTS was lifted to defray additional expenses of S. M. Haynes and W. P. Hayes, who were taken sick at Conference and for whom medical attention was given.

Question Thirty-Six. Where shall the next Conference be held? was called. J. A. Laughlin extended invitation to Gastonia and P. J. Cook to Mount Pleasant Church in Winston. Mount Pleasant Church, Winston-Salem was chosen as the seat of the next Annual Conference. The Conference extended thanks to J. A. Laughlin and the good people of Gastonia for their kind invitation.

Amendments. The proposed amendment to the Constitution with reference to granting seats to Laymen in the Annual Conference, was read by the Secretary. THIRTY-SIX yeas were cast for the adoption of the amendment; and SIXTEEN noes were registered against it.

Board of Trustees. S. A. Peeler, Treasurer of the Board of Trustees reported FIVE HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-THREE DOLLARS AND NINETY-FIVE CENTS on hand from Conference property.

Board of Stewards. On motion of R. E. Jones, ONE HUNDRED AND TWELVE DOLLARS of the money in hand was ordered turned over to the Board of Conference Stewards.

Resolution. J. P. Morris presented a resolution asking that TWELVE CENTS per member be collected by each Pastor for Local Conference Claimants. This resolution was heartily endorsed and adopted.

Time was extended on motion of G. W. Morehead.

Money Borrowed. On motion of H. L. Ashe, THREE HUNDRED DOLLARS was ordered borrowed by the Board of Conference Stewards to supplement the funds in hand for distribution to Local Conference Claimants.

R. B. McRary was elected Corresponding Secretary of the Local Conference Claimants Funds, and the moneys collected for Local Conference Claimants was ordered forwarded to him as soon as collected.

A Resolution adopted by the Lay Electoral Conference was presented to the Conference proposing an increase in ministerial support. On motion of S. P. West, the Conference extended thanks to the Lay Electoral Conference for the same.

A Correspondence putting forth the work at Bennett College, and soliciting the continued support of the Conference was read. Dr. I. Garland Penn expressed in this communication his regrets for being unable to attend the sessions of the Conference.

A Resolution regarding the Conference Claimants collections was sent up from the Lay Electoral Conference. This resolution was adopted by the Conference. (See Resolutions).

Adjournment. With the benediction by N. J. Pass, the Session adjourned to meet in business session at TWO-THIRTY, P. M.

FOURTH DAY

SATURDAY AFTERNOON, November 15, 1919

Devotions were conducted by B. L. Burge.

Journal of the previous sessions was read and adopted with corrections.

Question Twenty-Eight. What is the Statistical Report? was called. See the Statisticians Report. This report was adopted.

Standing Committees. The Secretary of the Cabinet, J. P. Morris, nominated the Standing Committees for the ensuing year. These were approved by the Conference. (See Committees).

Conference Trustees. R. E. Jones nominated as Conference Trustees the following: R. E. Jones; J. P. Morris; R. W. Winchester; S. A. Peeler; A. H. Newsome; Robert Smith; S. F. B. Peace; M. M. Jones; M. J. Bullock and P. J. Cook. These were elected by ballot.

Properties. By motion of S. A. Peeler, the Conference Trustees acting jointly with the District Superintendent of the Wilmington District were granted permission to sell the Gibson and McCrimmon properties, and were ordered to turn the proceeds from the sale of the same over to the Conference Treasurer.

On motion of R. W. Winchester, the Conference Trustees acting jointly with the District Superintendent of the Winston District were granted permission to sell the Union Hall property, the proceeds from the sale of the same were ordered turned over to the Conference Treasurer.

Question Twenty-Nine. What is the Conference Treasurer's Report? was called. This report was adopted. (See Treasurer's Report).

Question Twenty-Six. What is the Annual Report of the Conference Board of Home Missions and Church Extension? was called. (See Report).

Question Twenty-Seven. What is the Annual Report of the Conference Board of Foreign Missions? was called. (See Report).

Question Thirty. (a) What is the aggregate of the Benevolent Collections, ordered by the General Conference, as reported by the Conference Treasurer? was called. \$16,474.00 was the answer.

(b) What is the Aggregate of the Benovolent Collections ordered by the Annual Conference as Reported by the Conference Treasurer? was called. \$995.00 was the answer.

Publicity Committee. On motion of H. L. Ashe, the Publicity Committee was asked to confer with the President of Bennett College with a view to purchasing an adding machine to be used by the Conference and College.

Tokens of Appreciation. R. E. Jones, in fitting remarks, presented to Bishop Frank M. Bristol a token of appreciation

from the Colored Conferences of the Chattanooga Area, in appreciation for his brotherly, efficient, and kind supervision of the work of the Area. Bishop Bristol in a glowing and appreciative address accepted the token presented.

R. G. Morris, requesting the floor for a question of privilege, called to the chancel, S. P. West, of the Western District; G. W. Byers, of the Greensboro District; W. W. Pope, of the Winston District; W. R. Zeigler of the Wilmington District, and R. W. Winchester for the Conference at large. These brethren presented to R. E. Jones a Loving Cup as a token of the sincere love and appreciation the Conference bears toward him, and as an appreciation for the Manly and Righteous Stand on the Commission of Unification. R. E. Jones, in warm and fitting terms accepted the gift.

A beautiful vase of flowers was presented the Conference as the Compliments of F. H. Ford, a florist of High Point. These too were received with proper courtesy and appreciation.

Question Thirty-Four. What amount has been paid by the Conference Treasurer to the Board of Conference Claimants

for Connectional Relief? was called. \$18.00 was the answer.

Benediction. After the benediction, the Session adjourned to meet in business session at EIGHT o'clock P. M.

FOURTH DAY

SATURDAY EVENING, November 15, 1919

By appointment of Bishop Bristol. H. L. Ashe presided.

N. C. Conference Memorial Association. A roll call for the North Carolina Memorial Association was had. FIFTEEN dollars was collected. Daniel Brooks was elected Treasurer; and N. M. Black was elected Secretary of the Association. The FIFTEEN DOLLARS was ordered turned over to the Treasurer.

**MEMORIAL FROM THE NORTH CAROLINA
CONFERENCE****Lynching**

The North Carolina Conference in Session November 12-16, 1919, authorized the following Memorial on the question of lynching in this country.

Whereas the Methodist Episcopal Church is the greatest cosmopolitan denomination in the United States of America, it having a Negro membership of 350,000;

Whereas the Methodist Episcopal Church with its Board of Bishops have always stood by the oppressed and maltreated of any race, as shown by articles in its Rule of Discipline and by its enviable record of the past;

Whereas the Democratic age demands that all people have equal rights and privileges and protection before the law:

Whereas the Rock River Conference put itself on record as being against lynching;

Whereas lynching and mob violence are detrimental to our Democratic form of Government, and contrary to the Spirit of the Constitution of the United States; and

Whereas in the recent war of Europe, the Negro was absolutely loyal to the Flag of the Government, and to the proudest traditions of America's spirit of freedom;

Resolved that we respectfully memorialize the General Conference, assembled in the city of Des Moines to instruct the Committee on Revision of the Discipline to insert some paragraph declaring the Church against the diabolical practice of lynching.

MEMORIAL FROM THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

Financial Year; Apportioned Benevolences, and Conference Courses of Study

The North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church at its recent session in High Point, N. C., November 12-16, 1919, authorized the following Memorial on the Closing of the Financial Year, Apportioned Benevolences, and Conference Course of Study.

The North Carolina Annual Conference, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, hereby respectfully memorialize the General Conference of 1920, to determine a date for closing the financial year of the General Conference Benevolences, and that the necessary legislation for the collection of General Conference Statistics be enacted.

That we memorialize the General Conference to create one fund for the six Apportioned Benevolences and the Centenary Fund, and that the General Conference Benevolences be administered from this one fund, and that the charges be instructed to report accordingly.

That we ask the Committee on Conference Course of Study to prepare a comprehensive Course in the Statistics and Records required by the Discipline, for the use of the candidates for admission to our Conferences, in which a written examination shall be required.

FOR THE LAY ELECTORAL CONFERENCE

Whereas, the cost of living has increased one hundred per cent in the last four years while there has been very little increase in many cases no increase whatever in the salaries paid our ministers and whereas, the ability of our people to pay has been very largely advanced through the increase of wages to laborers and the increase in prices of all farm products and whereas, this increase in the needs of a family as represented by the cost of living and the increase in the ability of our people to pay ought to result in a corresponding increase in the salaries of our preachers:

Resolved, first, that all salaries of \$2,000 and less ought to be increased to an amount approximating an advance of \$100 per year since 1915 and that in salaries of over \$2,000 such increase is advisable as may be required by the increased cost of living.

Resolved, second, that as laymen of the Church upon whom the responsibility for the maintenance of an efficient ministry largely depends we recommend that the minimum amount of cash salary paid any preacher, who gives all his time to ministerial work, shall be \$800.00 and we pledge ourselves to use our utmost endeavor to bring every pastoral charge up to this suggested minimum.

IX. REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

Report of District Superintendent of the Greensboro District to the Annual Conference held in High Point, N. C., November 12, 1919

GREENSBORO DISTRICT

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

This has been the most eventful year in the history of Methodism. All of us know of the wonderful achievements of the Methodist Centenary at large. Great results both financially and spiritually have come because of the many smaller results obtained by almost every local church in the connection. The ministers and laity in all the churches of the Greensboro District acted well their part. During the time of preparation and all through the period of organization every pastor assisted by the Council and Unit leaders got busy and we rolled up a subscription of over \$30,000 one fifth of which (\$6,000) we are confident will be reported in cash to this Conference. Moreover, we have a telling organization given us through the Centenary the results of which are sure in the effect that was produced on the other finances of the church and upon the evangelical quickening, for about every point on the district has raised in full its ministerial support and has done something worthy of note on the other benevolences. The spiritual awakening is not to be overlooked, caused by the preaching of the rightful ownership of God of not only our incomes, but of ourselves. Our constituency are rapidly realizing that a portion of their time, their talent, their influence must be consecrated to God. Thus the evangelistic spirit, the spirit of winning wayward men to Christ has possessed hundreds of our own boys and girls and quite a number of them has signed the life service cards and have thereby consecrated themselves to the work of the Master.

We cannot mention the different charges seriatim, but suffice it to say that we have accomplished this year some of the greatest financial victories in our history. A general improvement materially has been made on almost every charge. A church covered, a recess added, a parsonage furnished, our grounds beautified, or something done to make better the material conditions of about every charge. However, there are three or four outstanding achievements that require special mention, At Pleasant Ridge, Va., a Mortgage of \$1800 has been paid off. At High street, Greensboro, there has been a mortgage of \$3000 burned this year, and St. Mathews Greensboro, has burned recently, a mortgage of \$7,000., \$4700. of which was paid this year. At Northwest Greensboro, we have banked \$1500 for a new church which money was raised this Conference year.

We are not blind to the fact that the church has upon it the greatest responsibility that has been thrust upon it since the advent of the Blessed Master. And it seems to us that our colored churches have a double load to carry. The preachers of both races in this Southland should realize that it is high time for us to be active in influencing the masses for righteousness and justice, therefore as Superintendent, we have not hesitated to exhort our people to be careful that they do no imprudent act nor speak an imprudent word which might stir up evil, for this is easily done in these days which try men's souls. We have also urged that our preachers take the lead in putting forth active propaganda that will bring good feelings between the two races that must and occupy our great country and form its best constituency.

The best white South is showing signs of deep interest in the Negro and is not hesitating to express its conviction that justice should be given

to all alike. It would be an act of ingratitude if the leaders of our people did not show their appreciation of these good intentions expressed by our white brothers, by doing out best to have our people to join with them in bringing about this good feeling and in putting down crime and lawlessness in both races. The brethren have not been slow in seeing that they should join us in instructing the masses along these lines. In these days of reconstructing a world we feel that it is the duty of the Gospel preachers to take the lead. The state is whatever the people are, and the people are measured by the Christian principles fostered, and these principles are instilled by Gospel preaching, and living the Christ-like life. Thus we, in our quarterly meetings and other meetings, have endeavored to impress these higher duties upon, not only the laity but upon ourselves as ministers, local preachers, official boards and other local leaders of the people at large.

EDUCATION

Bennett College, under the leadership of President Frank Trigg, is enjoying one of the most prosperous years in its history. There are now on roll 365 students. The accomodation for boarding students have been exhausted for more than a month. Thirty-five students have been turned away this year for lack of room to lodge them. The Campus presents a beautiful appearance. Over \$2000 worth of improvements have been put on the exterior of the buildings in the form of paints and wood-work, which gives them an excellent appearance. There has been a steam heating plant put in the girls dormitory at a cost of \$1200. This, of course, renders both comfort and decency to the young ladies. Kent Home, our training school for girls, is also on the same campus with Bennett College and is sharing with Bennett in its prosperity. Another addition over recent previous years is the excellent corps of teachers engaged in the literary and other departments of the work. It appears at present that we are going to stand among the first ranks of our Freedman Aid Schools.

"SUPER-ANNUATES"

There are three Super-Annuates on our district, who are active, live, wide-awake, Christian workers. Brothers L. B. Gibson, S. McDonald, and L. W. Thomas. We bespeak for them along with the others your most considerate attention.

We heartily concur with Dr. Hingeby in urging our active ministry to see to it that all arrears of the super-annuates be raised.

"SOUTHWESTERN"

We have urgently pressed the claims of the Southwestern Christian Advocate. We feel that it will be (difficult, impossible) to carry out our program of Methodism without the assistance of a church paper in every home, for this reason added to the many other reasons we have conjointly with the pastors striven to bring up our quota for our paper. Some of the brethren have sent in quite a number of subscriptions during the year which will be credited to their account.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT. REPORT OF THE WESTERN DIST. WESTERN DISTRICT

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

By the help of God I am permitted to present you my first report of the Western District. I was appointed to this District November

17th, 1918, by the hand of our beloved Bishop, Frank M. Bristol. I found the work in a good condition made so by my predecessor, the Rev. A. H. Newsome.

I had not been in the District but a few weeks until I realized that my appointment was providential. So I vowed to the Lord that I would follow his unerring counsel. We held our Ministerial council in the month of February. The majority of the brethren were present, and we put on our centenary plan, and I learned in the District Superintendence meeting held in Knoxville, Tenn., that we were on the right line. We pushed forward until our Sunday School and Epworth League Convention held at Brooks Chapel.

Brooks Chapel is a very historical place. It is fourteen miles from anywhere at the foot of the Blue Ridge Mountains; it is the birth-place of our late Isaac Wells, who made it possible for me to make this report and the beloved Daniel Brooks, who is honored by this conference, and the silver tongued orator, the Rev. R. N. Brooks, our Sunday School worker.

There we brought our plans together, our pastors and minute men unite leaders which resulted in raising in cash and subscription on the first day of the Intensive drive \$62,500, over the top one hundred and forty-two per cent. It is said by those who attended the District Conference that it was one of the best in the history of the District. Our visiting friends were, R. G. Morris, R. N. Brooks and R. W. Winchester.

Summary of the District

Reports will show that there has been some advancement on all lines. Our Schools, Allen Home and Duglas Academy are running over. Southwestern Christian Advocate reports will show an increase.

1 Asheville has closed the best years' work in the history of the Church. They have plans for a \$30,000 Church. Increase in membership, 20; Benevolences \$102.00; Centenary \$227.00

2 Bessemer City and Kings Mountain. This charge has made great improvements. They are over the top in everything.

3 Boone and Jefferson. There has been some advancement made on this charge, and it bids fair to be a good work in the near future.

4 Buffalo and Elksville. Those people are thinly settled. The A. M. E. Church is doing work paralel with ours. There ought to be a federation there in our favor.

5 Cherryville and Galilee. Rev. D. A. Williams failed and this charge was put with Bessemer City and Lincolnton.

6 Ebenezer and Cornelius. This charge has done well. We need a modern church at Cornelius.

7 Franklin. This charge ought to be called the plucky yellow jackets of the west for we only have 36 members and they have paid over \$460.00 salary, raised all claims, and say they are willing to do more another year.

8 Forest City and Bracketown. One half of the members of this charge were taken and put with Shelby, but they have done more this year than they did last year.

9 Gastonia and Mt. Holly. Those people have done some constructive work and bids fair to become one of the leading appointments on the District with the proper leadership.

10 Hickory. On account of the location and many other reasons

Hickory may be called the hub of the District. They are over the top on all lines.

11 Lawndale and Flat Rock. This is the most city-like country charge in the conference, only one church with a membership of 150, and 18 of them are teaching in the country and city schools. They are over the top.

12 Lenoir. This is the most transient place on the District and for this reason it is difficult to keep the work normal.

13 Lincolnton and Cherryville. This charge was supplied by A. Y. Price, who deceased in February, then it was supplied by J. E. Powell. This charge has been neglected, and we ought to make some special effort to save Lincolnton. If not, we ought to withdraw from the field.

14 Lowesville and Stanley. They will have the best church building on the District, when completed. They have made great improvements in the last three years.

15 Machpelah and Denver. This charge has found a report, and the largest Centenary gift on the District, and I believe in the Conference, for we have a member who is kept up by the County. She said that she wanted to help in this great movement, and asked me would the church accept \$1.00 a year, notwithstanding we have those who are giving as high as \$50.00 a year, and your humble servant \$1.00 a year, but this one dollar is my large gift.

16 Marion and Addie's Chapel. This is one of the most hopeful charges we have, as it was the first charge that went over the top. We hope to build a modern church soon.

17 Mooresville and Mayhew. We have got in Mooresville at last, and our work is growing very fast. We need a new church there, and also at Mt. Mourne.

18 Newton and Conover. There has been some improvement made on this charge, and it has been brought up to good appointment. It went over the top about 200 per cent.

19 Old Fort and the Glades. This is a plucky little appointment with less than 75 members. They have raised over \$760.00 salary and raised all claims over the top with the centenary.

20 Shelby and Brooks. This charge has done the best years' work in its history.

21 Sherrill Ford. They have made some improvements at all of the points, but have not gone over the top, but hope to soon.

22 Statesville and Philadelphia. There have been some improvements made there, and the work bids fair to become a good self-supporting charge in a few years.

23 West Asheville and Waynesville. They have made some improvements at two of the points.

24 Wilkesboro. The pastor has worked hard to make things go over the top with the centenary.

Total increase in membership..... Benevolences \$.....

There are 21 appointments on the District, and I have been to all of the appointments, held four Quarters on 20 of the charges two or three of the charges at one point.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

Good health and general prosperity have been among the many blessings which we have enjoyed this year on the Wilmington District.

Reports from the charges will show increase in membership and in the finances. All the pastors got a raise in salary. Several of the charges made liberal donations to their pastors in order to help them avoid the embarrassment caused by high priced commodities or cheap money.

On the Hoffman and Sand Hill charge at St. Peter, a new church is about to be completed. E. L. Fletcher, who has supplied this work did much of the building with his own hands.

A new church has been erected at St. Mark on the Rennert and St. Mark charge. Ground on which to build a church has been purchased at Rennert.

The Mount Olive church on the Sanford Circuit is about to be finished.

Electric light plants have been installed at Bowmore, Piney Grove and Johns. A lot on which to build a parsonage has been secured at Red Springs. Many other smaller improvements and betterments have been made.

In the interest of the Centenary Drive our district was visited by teams sent out from area headquarters at Chattanooga, Tenn. These teams were led by Drs. J. C. Sherrill, N. D. Shambourger and E. J. Cox and Rev. R. G. Morris and Mr. Williams. Some success attended their labor.

Under the District Centenary Survey, we have projects for \$25,000.00, \$20,000.00 and \$15,000.00 at Laurinburg, Charlotte and Maxton, respectively. Plans are now under consideration for providing sufficient funds to complete the project at Laurinburg.

The Sunday School and Epworth League Convention held at Rowland was a success. The session of the District Conference held at Laurinburg in July was profitable.

Four of the retired ministers live within the bounds of this district. W. A. Hayes and H. O. Frederick show some decline in health. J. D. Hairston and A. B. McQueen are quite well. They all hold fast the faith once delivered the saints.

I visited nearly all of the charges four times and made one or more visits to every church except one. In the month of August I assisted in four of the successful revival meetings.

As a whole, there are signs of progress and growth on this district.

WINSTON DISTRICT

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

It affords me great pleasure to present to you the report of the great Winston District of the North Carolina Conference. The work of the District has been exceedingly hard owing to the increased responsibilities brought about by the great Centenary Movement, but we have endeavored to go forward in the name of the Master and to do our best to cope with the situation, notwithstanding embarrassments and difficulties and how well we have succeeded may be partially seen in this report of the District.

We have twenty-two pastoral charges. Forty-two Sunday Schools, forty churches, and twenty Women Home Missionary Societies. Fifteen Ladies Aid Societies, fifteen Epworth Leagues, also twenty-two charges with unit leaders at work.

Every charge has had a preacher for the whole year, without any changes except Advance and that was caused by circumstances of which could not be controlled. But the matter was amiably adjusted and Brothers Steed and Wagoner filled the appointment for the remainder of the year and there wasn't a break in the preaching services.

Health Conditions

The health of our preachers and their families has been good. We have emphasized the necessity of our preachers taking care of their needs for the mental and moral natures are sustained in the physical nature and that no man can do the best work whose health is impaired. "For," says Emerson, "wealth is health, and sickness is poor spirited and cannot help anyone."

Organizations

The Sunday Schools on the District are better and more thoroughly organized than they have ever been and that is due to the Centenary movement. New schools have been organized and old schools been reorganized, according to the latest ideas of Sunday School work.

Home departments, Cradle Rolls, Graded Lessons adopted, Teachers Training Classes formed, Adult Bible Classes organized and in short, better methods of instruction and better Teachers and Superintendents now in our schools than ever before, and owing to this we have brought about a higher standard of efficiency.

Epworth League

The League is something of a problem. They seem to be a fluctuating quantity. This is true in the reports of the Quarterly Conferences. Some Leagues do well for a while, then stop for a while start again. Other Leagues have been doing good work all the year and accomplished good results. Wherever we can find the proper persons for leaders the Leagues do good social and spiritual work. The majority of the Leagues need a great awakening which only can come through an enlarged vision of their duties and responsibilities to the Lord's cause, and pastors in a large measure to furnish this vision to the young people of their churches.

Women Societies

The Woman's Home Missionary societies and the Ladies Aid societies are not barren of good works. They have aided preachers in both material and Spiritual works. They have beautified the parsonages, aided in Ministerial support, and helped to raise the benevolences, also assisted in all the Spiritual meetings of the church. Without our good women the work couldn't prosper.

Our Literature

In some places I find a tendency to use other literature than that of our own Book Concern. I have discouraged this idea and have given them concrete examples of reasons why we should, beyond all means, stick to our literature. First it is the best to be found. Secondly, it helps our aged preachers and their widows in giving them aid at each Annual Conference. We have no one now that even speak about other literature.

Southwestern Christian Advocate, while speaking about good literature, we must not forget the Southwestern. Undoubtedly it is one of the best papers in Methodism. The people all over the District in rural places are singing its praises. Brethren, lets see to it that a Southwestern

goes into every home. Our people, if need be, ought to deprive themselves of food in order to read this great Journal. It is so inspiring encouraging and uplifting that no one can well do without it.

District Meetings

We had a well attended and very helpful session of the District Conference held in South High. The Rev. Gammon Morris was with us and conducted Institute meetings on the Centenary and its work. We also had visiting superintendents and Ex-Superintendents with us, and the services rendered by them and those on the program were exceedingly helpful.

Pastorial Support

The salaries paid our ministers are inadequate owing to the high cost of living to support themselves and families. A goodly number of our ministers have to resort to other employments in order to supplement their salaries so as to make a living, for themselves and those depending upon them for the necessities of life. I have called the attention of the Laymen to this inadequate support and in some places increases have been made, and at other places the brethren cannot see their way clear to make an advance. We cannot expect to do the work needed to be done in these strenuous times with an underfed and under-paid ministry. These brethren still feel their bodies and some steps must be taken along these lines if we are to hold ground already taken, much less go forward. It is surprising what a little some of our brethren get along with, but by economy of the strictest kind they pull through somehow. Mr. President, it takes a good deal of courage as well as religion to preach under such circumstances.

Benevolences

We cannot forecast at this writing of our report what the Benevolences will be, but we are sure our record along this line will not be marred in the least. We have faithfully and persistently put forward all the causes of the Church, and I believe after reports are read from the Pastors that the conference in a measure will be satisfied.

Education

It is with a degree of pleasure that we are enabled to say that our Educational Institutions are doing well. Bennett College has enjoyed a very prosperous year and the outlook for the future is better than I have known for years. As a Trustee of that Institution, we rejoiced at its beautiful appearance. No one would hardly know it now on account of its beautiful dress of which it has lately enrobed itself. The buildings have been painted on the outside and renovated on the inside, and the grounds have undergone a change by the hands of some excellent landscape artist until everything round and about looks so imposing that no one would hardly know the place. News comes that the City of Greensboro will soon install a heating plant. All of these things make Bennett College, indeed and in truth one of the leading Institutions in the South and we earnestly solicit the patronage of all good people desiring to give their children a Christian education. We congratulate President Trigg and his noble faculty for the work that is being done at Bennett College.

Kent Home and Allen Home are splendid places for our girls and should receive the patronage of our people. Miss Alice B. Dale, a competent and well experienced Christian woman has under her supervision Allen Home and the work that is being done for the uplifting our race can never be told. Also Kent Home situated in Greensboro adjacent to

Bennett College is under excellent management and is giving that knowledge which is last in this world and the world to come.

Spiritual Results

I am glad to report progress along this line. While we haven't had so many outstanding Revivals but the Spiritual conditions have been greatly changed. The work done has been more thorough and more permanent than that done in late years by having some so-called Evangelist to come, and by some unusual method get up a great excitement and create a great enthusiasm and then go taking all the goods seemingly with him. Our brethren are learning to be their own Evangelists and I find where meetings are held by the Pastors and people they do more good than those held by out-siders. Some of our pastors and people are enjoying a fuller measure of the presence of the Holy Ghost than in former years.

May the Doctrine of a New Birth witnessed by the Holy Ghost never ceased to be preached and that our people may attain to an experience where fear is cast out by perfect love.

Material Results

There has been some little improvement on almost on every charge but we have advised the people unless in a case of necessity to put off building until after the Great Cnetenary effort. However, we can report a new church at Hall's Ford, Va. Some work done at Rocky Mount, Va., enlargement of church at Rural Hall, repairs at Jonesville also at Elkin. bascment cemented and wooden floor over the cement at High Point.

Of Evangelism

The need of Evangelism is world-wide. The Commission: "Go ye into all the world and preach my Gospel to every creature" is as binding and forceful today as when first uttered. Evangelism is fundamentally important. It is the sine qua non of the world's salvation. We hear much of Social Salvation, the Purification of Society, Economic Justice, Prevention of War, Destruction of Saloons, Betterment Work and of Humanitarianism. Be it known to you that these programs will succeed only as they follow the program of Jesus Christ. The program of Modern Social Service is to cure existing evils by social means and thus reform society, but we, as representatives of Evangelism, believe in preaching society but we representatives of Evangelism believe in preaching the guilt of sin and by regeneration of the individual as the only sovereign means of saving the world. Further, the world cannot be saved wholesale but it must be by personal individualistic effort whether it be by Moses, Aaron or Eldad and Medad.

The task before us for a million of souls in only a few months must be accomplished by personal and individualistic touch of preachers and laity filled with the Spirit of God.

Unrest

There never has been more unrest among our people than today, and as I travel up and down and throughout the State and hear our people talk, it seems as the basis for the unrest is that Demorcacy is not applied to all people alike. On this account their souls have become discouraged and the torch of hope is burning dim, and almost put out. But Mr. President, I have preached a Gospel of Optimism and have repeatedly called attention to the fact that God isn't dead and He yet has the supervision and control of this world, and eventually all things will work out

for good to those that love Him. Therefore we will never give up but hope on, hope, though there is not a spark of light, which hope we have as an anchor both sure and steadfast.

Of the Centenary

With the assistance of Almighty God and the brethren, we went about to organize. By hard work we were able to perfect an organization which was a credit to us and our people. Dr. Fort Lowe wrote that I was the first on Chattanooga area to perfect an organization of 100 per cent, and asked me to speak a word at a meeting in Columbus, Ohio, if present, but the Cleveland, Ohio, Convention made it impossible for me to be there.

Secondly. After organization we began on our District to educate the people along religious and financial lines. In some of our churches the people went out two by two and made visitations from house to house praying and asking members to attend church. The result of such work was soon apparent in that the Prayer Meetings which had so long in most churches become dormant, received new life and the churches were filled with members crying mightily unto God for the outpouring of His Spirit, and the result was that new life was given to the churches and the membership increased and people became Stewards for the cause of God. In every instance where the program was adhered to, these results were obtained.

As to financial success, again we desire to state that the church that carried out the spiritual side of the program were the first churches that went over the top, both in subscriptions and money. So we recommend to the brethren not to let spiritual interest lug up their desire to be successful along financial lines. Therefore we feel that intercession, stewardship and life service are the best preservations the Centenary can have.

Again not only was our District thoroughly organized, but it was an organization at work. I am grateful to report 1611 Intercessors, 800 Tithers, and Five thousand and five hundred dollars in money I know about and other moneys I understand sent off which I have no record.

Therefore we say not in the spirit of boasting, but in all humbleness and submissiveness and with gratitude in our hearts to God for His Leadership without which the work could not be accomplished, that the Winston District is not only the Banner District in N. C. Conference, but the entire Chattanooga Area.

Brethren I thank you very much for your cooperation and also the Laity without which this work could not have been accomplished.

*Facts from the first nine sessions are gleaned from the General Minutes and from the Conference Journal for those years, which is now in custody of the North Carolina Conference of the M. E. Church, South.

At this date the Conference had 19,450 white members and 3,390 colored. Without consulting the wisdom of the latter, nearly the whole membership became a part of a new church, organized in May, 1845, and called the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Some entered the A. M. E. Church, some the Colored M. E. Church of America; but thousands turned gladly to the bosom of the old Methodist Episcopal Church, as it returned to the State.

• At this session a new Conference—the Blue Ridge—was formed, with twelve preachers, 2,839 members and probationers, and 41 church edifices.

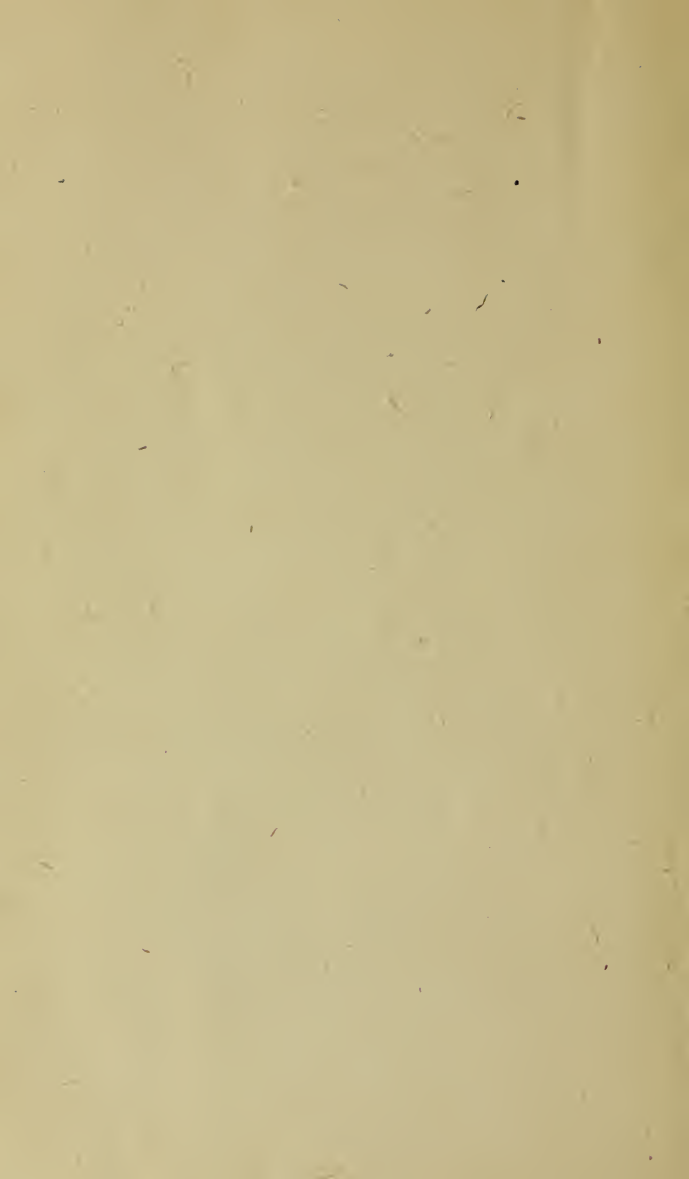
