Organization. Upon announcing the Conference open for organization A. H. Newsome placed in nomination as Secretary the name of G. H. Caldwell. By vote of the Conference he was elected. He named as his assistants J. A. Baxter, W. E. Hairston, R. N. Brooks.

For the next Conference session R. W. Winchester was elected Treasurer and P. I. Wells, Statistician. R. W. Winchester nominated as his assistants J. C. Rush, D. L. Thomas, A. W. McMaster, W. R. Ziegler, T. C. Frazier, J. M. Phelps, J. W. Simpson, R. S. Abernethy. P. I. Wells nominated as assistants W. M. Wells, P. F. Johnson, E. I. Swann, N. M. Black. These nominations were confirmed by the Conference.

The State Bank of Laurinburg, by motion of N. J. Pass, was made the official bank for the Conference deposits.

Hour of Adjournment. By motion of N. J. Pass the Conference ordered that the hour for opening the business sessions of the Conference be named as 9 o'clock, and the hour for adjourning be set at 12:30.

Morning Devotions. The suggestion by Bishop Wilson that the morning devotions be conducted at the close of the business of the morning session was approved by vote of the Conference.

Statistical Session was appointed to be held at 2:00 P. M. Wednesday.

Standing Committees. By motion of M. M. Jones, Secretary of the Cabinet, the Conference ordered that the standing committees appearing in the Conference Journal of 1921 be the standing committees for the present Conference session.

Rules Governing the Conference. By motion of R. W. Winchester the Conference ordered that the Rules of Order of the General Conference be the order of the Conference.

The Bar of the Conference by motion of S. A. Peeler, was made to include the first five rows of seats from the chancel.

Publicity Committee. By nomination of H. L. Ashe, R. G. Morris and R. N. Brooks were elected reporters to the daily press and the weekly periodicals. The Publicity Committee was ordered to arrange for any finances incident thereto.

The Committee on Conference Relations, by motion of R. W. Winchester, was increased from four to seven. The Committee appointed by Bishop Wilson and confirmed by the Conference were as follows:

S. A. Peeler, R. T. Weatherby, W. W. Pope, Robert Smith, W. M. Wells, J. W. Simpson, R. G. Morris.

Question Fourteen was called. H. L. Ashe, District Superintendent of the Greensboro District; J. A. Laughlin of the Western District; M. M. Jones of the Wilmington District, and P. J. Cook of the Winston District, each passed in character and reported respectively the work of his District.

Introductions. Dr. J. S. Burnett, representing the Board of Home Missions, addressed the Conference, putting forth the Ten Year Program of the Board. He also announced the askings of the four districts of the North Carolina Conference of the Board.

On motion of P. J. Cook the report was approved.

Dr. Luther Lovejoy, representing the Stewardship Program, and the Committee on Conservation and Advance of the Chicago Office, addressed the Conference.

Welcome Addresses. At the suggestion of Bishop Wilson the program of the welcome addresses was changed so that all the welcomes should come first in succession and the responses should follow.

Judge E. H. Gibson, representing His Honor, Mayor H. W. Malloy, of Laurinburg; Dr. W. R. Royal, Pastor of the M. E. Church, South; Rev. J. B. Frances, of the Presbyterian Church, representing the negro churches of Laurinburg, and Dr. W. E. Jackson, representing the local church, each made addresses of welcome.

In response to these addresses, S. A. Peeler and R. G. Morris represented the Conference in accepting these hearty welcomes.

After the usual announcements, the Conference adjourned with the Doxology and the benediction by Bishop Wilson.

FIRST DAY

Wednesday Afternoon Session

Devotions conducted by Bishop Wilson.

A **Draft** from the Chartered Fund of \$35.00 and one from the Book Concern of \$375.00 were presented by the Bishop and on motion of R. W. Winchester, were ordered paid to the Conference Stewards.

Mr. C. R. Atkins of the Book Concern was presented to the Conference.

Question Fourteen was resumed. The Effective Elders and the Probationers of the Four Districts were each passed in character, after which as their charges were called by Bishop Wilson, they reported to Treasurer and Statistician.

Question Two. Bishop Wilson announced that the transfer of James M. Harris from the Central Missouri Conference, and E. D. Petty from the Atlanta Conference had been perfected.

Question Twenty-four was called. The retiring ministers are: Daniel Brooks, H. O. Frederick, J. D. Hairston, Elisha Howard, A. B. McQueen, L. W. Thomas, and M. J. Bullock. Each of these passed in character and made brief addresses to the Conference.

Question Twenty-three was called. By a two-third vote of the Conference S. B. Cornelius for the 7th year, and W. H. Webster for the 6th year were passed in character and were continued in the Supernumerary Relation.

Question Thirty-six was called. For the seat of the next Annual Conference, R. W. Winchester put in nomination St. Matthews, Greensboro; S. A. Peeler nominated St. Paul,

Winston, and R. G. Morris nominated Lexington. Representation for each of the places was made by R. W. Winchester, J. P. Morris, and P. I. Wells, respectively.

On motion of G. W. Morehead the Conference ordered that the vote be taken by ballot.

W. E. Hairston of the Greensboro District; John H. Isham, of the Western District; N. M. Black of the Wilmington District, and S. A. Peeler of the Winston District were appointed tellers. On motion of J. P. Morris the Conference ordered that the vote be decided by majority count.

On the first ballot Greensboro received thirty-four votes, Winston 6, and Lexington 29. There was no election. The second ballot counted Greensboro 34, Winston 1, Lexington 34. There was no election. On the third ballot Greensboro received 31 votes, Lexington 40. Lexington was declared the seat of the next Conference.

By motion of R. W. Winchester the election to Lexington was made unanimous.

The Conference extended a vote of thanks to Greensboro and Winston for their kind invitations.

Conference Journal Fund. H. L. Ashe read a resolution from the Journal of last Conference which ordered that the Publishing Committee ascertain the amount necessary to publish the minutes, and apportion that sum to the respective districts and charges for collection within 30 days of the adjournment of the Conference.

On motion of P. J. Cook those amounts were ordered paid by the pastors to their District Superintendents at this Conference session.

After proper announcements, the Conference adjourned with the benediction by Dr. Burnett.

SECOND DAY

Thursday Morning Session

Devotions were conducted by Bishop Wilson.

The Journal for the previous sessions was read by the Secretary, and with proper corrections was approved.

The Bishop ordered the Statistician and Treasurer call the names of the delinquents that they might report.

The Secretary was ordered to call the roll for the benefit of those failing to answer at the opening session.

By motion of A. H. Newsome, the Conference granted any other members of the Conference arriving later to report to the Secretary that their presence might be noted.

Question Sixteen was called. L. B. Gibson and W. P. Hayes were reported deceased.

Question One was called. The Conference has a Board of Trustees in compliance with the State law.

Question Fifteen was called. No one was transferred.

A strong address was presented by Bishop Wilson in which he urged that the watchword for the Centenary be "Forward" or "Carry On."

This address was the outgrowth of his announcement that a telegram from the Home Office announced sufficient collection to maintain the work begun in the home and foreign fields.

Dr. D. W. Howell of the Deaconess Board was introduced and presented his work in a brief address.

Question Six was called. Herbert C. Gannaway, Wm. C. L. Scarborough, Frank J. Lee, Marshall McCallum and J. B. Meekins were continued on trial and advanced to the studies of the Second Year.

Question Eight was called. F. D. Caldwell and A. S. McGowans were admitted to full membership, elected to Deacons Orders, and advanced to the studies of the Third Year. A. D. McDonald was admitted to full membership, and advanced to the studies of the Third Year, he having been elected Deacon previously. This action was taken, conditioned on satisfactory answers to the questions prescribed in the Discipline.

Question Ten was called. J. H. Isham was advanced to the studies of the Fourth Year.

Question Eleven was called. R. S. Abernethy, Arthus M. Erwin and Nathaniel M. Martin were graduated from the Conference course of studies, and elected to Elder's Orders. This action was taken, conditioned on satisfactory answers to the questions prescribed in the Discipline.

Question Five was called. Robert McRae was received on trial and placed in the studies of the first year. John Edward Brown was received on trial under the Seminary Rule and placed in the studies of the Third Year, he having been ordained Deacon previously.

Question Twelve was called. Herbert C. Gannaway, Henry J. Jones, J. H. Meeks, Jasper B. Meekins, Marshall McCallum, Frank J. Lee, Wm. C. Scarborough, Belvin R. Wagoner, and J. E. Peeler were elected to Deacons' Orders as Local Preachers.

The Conference, on motion of G. W. Morehead, ordered that when we adjourn, we adjourn to meet at 2:00 P. M.

Introductions. Dr. J. C. Sherrill, Executive Secretary of the Chattanooga Area, was introduced and addressed the Conference; N. D. Shambourger, Atlanta Conference; Frank Trigg, President Bennett College; L. H. King, Editor of Southwestern Christian Advocate; and Fred D. Butler of the Epworth League, were introduced to the Conference.

By motion of A. H. Newsome, the Conference ordered that after the announcements and devotions the morning session should stand adjourned.

Pursuant to the previous order Bishop Wilson conducted devotions, reading a portion of Matthew, 6th chapter, delivered the address from the subject of Prayer, after which he dismissed with prayer.

SECOND DAY

Afternoon Session

Devotions were properly conducted.

A resolution offered by J. P. Morris and seconded by R. W. Winchester, reviving an order of some years previous, that an amount of money equal to an average of ten cents per member be apportioned to each charge in the Conference, such amount to be applied to Conference Claimants. This action was afterward rescinded.

On motion of R. T. Weatherby these amounts were ordered collected by the District Superintendents at the District Conference.

Bennett College Trustees. S. A. Peeler offered a motion that to the Trustees of Bennett College be added the names of H. L. Ashe and Dr. W. H. Bruce. The Conference ordered that the Secretary cast the ballot of the Conference. The Secretary announced the ballot cast, and H. L. Ashe and Dr. W. H. Bruce were declared elected.

Class for Admission. Bishop Wilson delivered the address to the class for admission and asked the questions prescribed by the Discipline.

The final vote was then put.

S. A. Peeler Presides. Bishop Wilson retired accompanied by the members of the cabinet. S. A. Peeler was asked to preside in his stead.

Dr. Saunders of the East Tennessee Conference was introduced. In an address he brought greetings from the Tennessee Conferences, and spoke on the work of the Centenary.

Dr. L. H. King of the Southwestern Christian Advocate, addressed the Conference.

After announcements the Conference adjourned with the benediction by Dr. Saunders.

THIRD DAY

Friday Morning Session

Devotions were conducted by M. C. Laughlin. D. Brooks led the Conference in prayer.

Daily Journal. The journal of Thursday's session was read, and after corrections was approved.

The Committee on Conference Relations reported that in the case of L. W. Thomas he remain in the retired relation. The report was approved.

Question Twenty-three was called. Sandy B. Cornelius for the seventh year, and Walter H. Webster for the sixth year by two-thirds vote of the Conference were continued in the supernumerary relation.

By motion of S. A. Peeler his District Superintendent was requested to notify W. H. Webster that it is the desire of the Conference that he locate, and that if he does not on his own initiative, the Conference would take action in his case.

Church Location. G. W. Morehead raised the question relative to the function of the Committee on Church Location. In answer to him Bishop Wilson read that passage in Discipline appertaining to the Committee on Church Relation.

Publishing Committee. H. L. Ashe requested the Secretary to report relative to the collections on the permanent minute fund. The Secretary read the names and amounts of those who had paid on the last year's collections.

H. L. Ashe moved that the Conference comply within 60 days with the requirements of the resolution on page 27 of the Journal of 1921.

J. P. Morris offered as an amendment to the motion that the District Superintendents be responsible for the collection of this fund as well as for its maintenance. The amendment with the original motion was adopted. That the matter of the minute fund be thoroughly understood, and that the pulse of the Conference might be felt with regards to its possible interpretation, a committee of 7 was appointed by motion of J. A. Baxter and R. W. Winchester. By motion of R. J. Shipp the chair was empowered to appoint the committee. The chair appointed S. A. Peeler, N. J. Pass, G. W. Morehead,

J. P. Morris, R. W. Winchester, G. H. Caldwell, J. A. Baxter.

This committee was requested to meet and report the finding to the Conference Saturday morning.

On motion of J. W. Simpson the Conference ordered that when we adjourn, we adjourn to meet at 3:00 in the afternoon.

J. P. Morris was asked to preside at the afternoon session.

A Draft from the Board of Conference Claimants to the amount of \$604.55 was presented to the Conference. The check was ordered paid to Treasurer of the Steward Board.

Question Twenty-two was called. The orders of L. D. McQueen returning to the Conference from the A. M. E. Zion Church, were recognized as Local Deacon's Orders.

Introductions. J. N. C. Coggins, Secretary of the Board of Prohibition, Temperance and Public Morals was introduced. He addressed the Conference.

By motion of R. B. Rhyne, after the announcements and the completion of the devotional period the Conference should stand adjourned.

THIRD DAY

Friday Afternoon Session

Devotions were properly conducted. J. P. Morris led in prayer.

Pursuant to the order of the morning, J. P. Morris as chairman, introduced Mrs. Below, President of Woman's Home Missionary Society, who led in conducting the program of the Society. The program was featured with a paper from the Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Constance Peeler, on her trip to and experiences at the National Convention at Pittsburg, Pa., and the President's address.

A collection of \$25.00 was raised for the Conference Society.

After announcements the session adjourned with the benediction by J. P. Morris.

FOURTH DAY**Saturday Morning Session**

Devotions were conducted. Bishop Wilson led in prayer.

The Journal for Friday's sessions was read and after corrections was approved.

The Committee on the Conference Minute Sinking Fund reported its plan by which \$300.00 might be raised as a sinking fund. The plan, as outlined, proposed that the pastors pay on the basis of salaries paid in the respective charges. These definite amounts are to be reported to the District Superintendents within 90 days of the adjournment of Conference. For full details see the report of the Committee.

On motion of M. M. Jones, S. A. Peeler, N. J. Pass, G. W. Morehead, J. P. Morris, R. W. Winchester, J. A. Baxter, G. H. Caldwell, and the four District Superintendents were made the Publishing Committee.

Special Appointments. By motion of H. L. Ashe, and the concurrence of Bishop Wilson, R. T. Weatherby was appointed to the Commission of Evangelism under the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension; G. H. Caldwell was appointed as Dean of Bennett College; R. H. Brooks as President of Sam Houston College, Austin, Texas.

President Frank Trigg. A question arose with regard to rearrangements of Anniversary program, thus omitting the address of President Frank Trigg of Bennett College.

R. W. Winchester, in a resolution, offered explanation and apology. (See Resolution).

Whereas the intelligence has come to the Conference that President Frank Trigg feels himself slighted because he was prevented to appear on program at the appointed time, be it

Resolved, That the Conference request Bishop Wilson to send a telegram informing Prof. Trigg that the Conference had no intention whatever to ignore his valuable service, nor cast any disrepute upon the great work he is doing at Bennett College.

Bennett College Institute. The matter of the Bennett College Institute was brought up in a resolution by J. A. Baxter. R. W. Winchester moved that the Institute be held at Bennett College at the most opportune time during the school session.

Question Twenty-eight was called. The Statistician read his report. (See Statistician's report.)

Question Twenty-nine was called. The Treasurer read his report. (See Treasurer's report.)

At the end of these reports Bishop Wilson made some timely and fatherly remarks urging the members of the Conference to put their shoulders together for the progress and good of the Conference.

A communication from Dr. I. Garland Penn, Secretary of the Board of Education for Negroes, regretting his inability to be present and stating some encouraging facts with regards to his Board and the Centenary was read to the Conference.

A telegram of greetings from R. B. McRary was read to the Conference.

Dr. Charles R. Oaten of the Board of Conference Claimants, was introduced. He made an address, presenting the work of his Board.

The Secretary of the Cabinet nominated the Conference Boards and the Standing Committees, which were approved by the Conference. (See Committees).

D. Brooks was elected Treasurer and S. A. Peeler Assistant Treasurer of the Local Board of Conference Claimants.

Question Thirty-four was called. \$25.00 was announced as the amount paid by the Conference Treasurer to the Board of Conference Claimants for Connectional Relief.

The Conference, by motion of G. W. Morehead, voted to suspend with the practice of preaching a Missionary sermon as such in the Annual Conference.

By motion of R. D. Bethea, at the close of the Missionary service the Conference should stand adjourned.

Dr. Philip M. Waters, representing Gammon Theological

Seminary, brought greetings to the Conference and special encouragement to candidates for the ministry. After the Missionary Sermon, the Conference adjourned.

FOURTH DAY

Saturday Afternoon

Devotions were conducted by Bishop Wilson.

Conference Board of Trustees. S. A. Peeler and R. W. Winchester reported jointly for the Board of Annual Conference Trustees. (See report of Trustees).

On motion of J. P. Morris, the \$130.00 interest accruing from Conference investments in the hands of the Board of Trustees, was ordered paid to the Board of Stewards to be distributed to Conference Claimants.

An Institute. J. P. Morris offered a resolution directing that one day be set aside at each of the District Conferences for instructions in making reports. The resolution was adopted.

Missionary Sermon. The action of the morning suspending with the missionary sermon was reconsidered by motion of J. W. Simpson.

The Secretary of the Cabinet nominated N. J. Pass to preach the Missionary sermon with R. G. Morris alternate. The nomination was confirmed.

Standing Committees. The following Standing Committees reported: Board of Education; Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morals; Bennett College, each of which was adopted.

Publicity Fund. By motion of P. I. Wells, a contribution of 25 cts. from each of the ministers of the Conference was ordered collected to defray the expenses of the Publicity Committee. At the calling of the roll \$18.50 was collected.

By motion of H. L. Ashe the Secretary of the Conference was elected Treasurer of the Publicity Fund.

W. T. Lomax offered a motion that a committee be appointed to collect from those ministers not responding at the roll call. The Conference ordered that the committee be composed of W. T. Lomax, J. A. Cherry, Wm. M. Wells, and P. I. Wells.

Recess. By motion of E. H. McArthur the Conference voted a recess of twenty minutes, business to be resumed at four o'clock.

The Conference resumed business after singing: "We Will Understand it Better By and By."

Conference Stewards. The Board of Conference Stewards reported. The Board recommended the \$5.00 for every \$100.00 collected as salary for pastor be the apportioned amount to each of the charges for Conference Claimants. By motion of J. P. Morris the motion of the morning that 10 cents per member be collected for Conference Claimants was rescinded.

The recommendation of the Board of Stewards was adopted.

Use of Tobacco. D. H. Kearse offered a resolution opposing the use of tobacco in any form. The resolution was approved. (See Resolution).

Other Reports. Any other reports were ordered passed in to the Secretary and included in the printed Journal.

Courtesies. The report of the Committee on Courtesies was approved without reading, the report to be read at the Sunday services.

Nominating Committee. On motion of R. G. Morris and P. I. Wells a Nominating Committee of five persons, one from each of the four Districts and the Secretary of the Conference was ordered elected to nominate the members of the respective and various Standing Committees. The committee as elected were: G. M. Phelps, R. G. Morris, W. M. Wells, P. I. Wells, and G. H. Caldwell.

Printed Journal. By motion of G. H. Caldwell 1200 minutes were ordered printed. By motion of G. H. Caldwell the

printed Journal was made the official record of the Conference.

Publicity Fund. The Treasurer of the Publicity Fund reports. The report was adopted. (See report).

Checks. The checks to the Conference Claimants were distributed by the Conference Stewards.

Adjournment. The Conference ordered that after the approval of the Journal, and after the Ordination service, and after the reading of the appointments the Conference should adjourn sine die.

VIII. REPORTS

REPORT OF THE GREENSBORO DISTRICT

Mr. President and Members of the Conference:

Another year of Christian Service passes into history. I come to report the labors and achievements of the Greensboro District. We have labored hard and attained to some degree of success. The Lord has blessed us with health and every pastor has been at his post of duty throughout the year.

Brother L. B. Gibson, one of our retired ministers, departed this life in the Spring. He finished his course and passed into the Beyond to receive his reward.

I have traveled the entire district four times during the year, held Quarterly Conferences in all the charges and rendered whatever services possible. No pains have been spared to bring our folks in line with the program of the church. Every phase of the work has been carefully looked after and it is gratifying to announce that some progress, at least, is being made along all lines.

The slump in business, scarcity of labor and extraordinary weather conditions have necessitated much sacrifice on the part of laymen and preachers and greater efforts had to be put forth to keep things up to the standard. But, the faithful pastors and loyal laymen have been true and kept the banner flying.

Summary

A brief reference to the charges where progress has been made will indicate what has been accomplished throughout the District.

Brown Summit has had a very good year under the leadership of Brother H. C. Gannaway.

Central Randolph, under the leadership of Brother F. H. Lee, has had unprecedented success, and Brother Lee shows strong elements of leadership.

We have not been able to get things lined up at Durham as we had hoped at the beginning of the year. Dr. D. H. Kearse, the pastor, has labored under disadvantages and kept things going at Creedmore.

Empire. Brother J. B. Meekins is the successful pastor there and has wrought well. He has more than doubled the Centenary Funds, and the ministerial support has been increased. He now has plans on foot to erect a new church.

East Greensboro. Brother W. R. Zeigler, one of our strong preachers, has labored in this charge faithfully, preaching able sermons and building up the spiritual and ministerial interests of the Charge.

High Street. Brother Ed. Petty was transferred to this charge from the Atlanta Conference last Fall, being one of the prominent psators in that Conference and an Ex-District Superintendent, he has given this church a leadership which has brought to it unprecedented success. The entire allotment for Centenary has been raised and \$50.00 on the Emergency Fund. Brother Petty has won the affections of both ministers and laymen of the North Carolina Conference.

Northeast. Brother M. McCallum, one of our young ministers, is popular with his people and shows elements of strong leadership.

St. Matthews. Brother R. W. Winchester is the pastor. He has successfully led the forces to victory. This great church is constantly going forward and becoming a larger force for good. The Centenary collections here have been increased with a handsome sum for the Emergency Fund.

South. Brother G. W. Byers has labored on this charge and brought success, as he usually does. He is a strong, earnest preacher of the Gospel and keeps the Spiritual fires burning.

Northwest. Brother W. T. Lomax is the pastor. A splendid brick church has been erected on Warren Street, taking place of the Rhode Island Church, and the membership and congregation are taking on new life. This church bids fair to be one of our strong churches in the near future.

Guilford. This is one of our largest circuits. Brother A. H. Newsome is the pastor, and has wrought well, with splendid results. Large increase in the Centenary collections and every phase of the work developed.

Leaksville. Brother W. E. Hairston is pastor. He and his accomplished young wife have labored very successfully here and endeared themselves to the people and the outlook for that charge is bright.

Norfolk, Virginia. Brother J. R. McNair is the pastor. This is a difficult field by reason of the fact that we have a small and unattractive church building but, in spite of this handicap, Brother McNair has increased the membership and congregation.

Newport News. Brother J. C. Rush, one of our young pastors, has labored hard here under many disadvantages, but has brought success.

Oxford and Bullocks. Brother J. M. Harris was transferred to this charge last Conference from the Central Missouri Conference. He proved to be the right man, in the right place. The charge took on new life and has done a remarkable work this year and they plead for his return.

Ramseur. Brother G. W. Morehead is the pastor and has been very faithful in his service to this charge and brought success.

Reidsville. Brother G. M. Phelps is the popular pastor. He is not only a good preacher, but a good pastor and financier. At the close of the last Conference they had a large debt on the new church which made the obligations heavy and at times discouraging, but Brother Phelps has lead the forces and handled the situation with great credit.

Wentworth, where Brother J. H. Garrett has been pastor, has had a successful year.

All of the supplies have been active and accomplished very much.

Townsville, under the leadership of Brother D. A. Willis, has enjoyed one of the greatest revivals in its history.

West Raleigh. Brother D. L. Thomas has served his fourth year and leaves the charge in good shape, year by year bringing material improvements and numerical increase.

The Educational Work on the District is Making Progress

Bennett College opened the first month with three hundred students in all departments, the Senior High School having the largest number in its history, more than two hundred. The Junior High School was inaugurated last year at the beginning of the session but put in full operation September 18th, 1922. The institution has four departments, namely, Junior High School, Senior High School, Classical or College and Teacher-Training Department.

The Staff of the institution is composed of twenty-one men and women of unquestioned ability. Every member of the staff has his work thoroughly in hand, hence the college is moving on smoothly in all departments.

The faculty and student body of the institution made special effort October 26th, to raise money for the "I Will Maintain" Fund, and secured four hundred and twenty-five dollars, which was presented through the office at Cincinnati to the treasurer.

The new buildings completed for use April, 1922, have been splendidly equipped and are occupied. These buildings are the admiration of all visitors. The grounds of the College are being laid off in walks and drives with a view to planting trees and shrubbery on the entire campus, thus leading to the aspect of a great park with buildings artistically located. The campus is enclosed on four sides by improved streets making the college site handsome.

Now, Mr. President, and Brethren of the Conference, in submitting this report we realize that it comes far short of the ideal, but what we plead for is that the future labors may bring forth greater results and fellowship and larger co-operation on the part of the laymen. This condition we must obtain if we would successfully combat the enemy. The opposition to Christian living and Christian doing is greater than at any period in the history of Christianity. The problems are many times multiplied; they cannot be solved single handed. Let us go to the task with a determination of iron; a will of steel and a heart of love and ere long shouts of victory will be heard throughout the camp as a result of our efforts.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT OF THE WESTERN DISTRICT, NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

Through the mercy of our Heavenly Father I am permitted to make my 4th annual report.

We have had good revivals on most of the charges and many have been added to the church.

Summary of the District

We have worked hard to make one hundred per cent. on all lines and reports will show an increase.

1. **Asheville.** We have had a successful year and are planning to build a new church in the near future.

2. **Bessemer City and Galilee.** These people are to be encouraged. They have built a new parsonage and the pastor is in it and they are now moving on nicely.

3. **Boone.** Brother Powell has had a good year and the people want him back.

4. **Catawba.** Much improvement has been made on this charge.

5. **Ebenezer and Cornelius.** Brother Stewart has worked hard with little results.

6. **Franklin.** This place is one hundred per cent. on all lines.

7. **Forest City.** The right man is at the right place. They raised their full amount of Centenary, Easter, and they are planning to build a brick church.

8. **Gastonia.** This charge has made three hundred per cent. in three years and bids fair to be one of the best stations on the District.

9. **Hickory.** Much can be said about this point. They have remodeled the parsonage and renovated the church and now have the best plant on the District.

10. **Jefferson.** Brother Peeler has had a successful year. Some have been added to the church.

11. **Kings Mountain.** Brother Dunham has had a good year. They are over the top on all lines.

12. **Lawndale.** This charge has not done so well, but the pastor has done the best he could.

13. **Lenoir.** The pastor and people are much encouraged over their year's work. Some have been added to the Church and they are making a round report.

14. **Lincolnton and Mt. Holly.** The pastor has worked under embarrassment all the year therefore the work has not gone forward as we hoped.

15. **Lenoir Circuit.** Brother J. A. Cherry, by consent of the first Quarterly Conference, resigned to go to Reidsville to teach, and the work was supplied by Brother J. H. Meeks and he has done well.

16. **Lovesville and Stanley.** They have had a successful year. Some have been added to the church.

17. **McPelah and St. James.** This work has not done so well. The pastor has not stayed on the job.

18. **Marion.** This work bids fair to be one of the best stations on the District when we get the new church completed. The pastor has not been able to stay on the job as he ought.

19. **Mooresville and Mayhew.** Brother Shambourger is building a nice church at Mooresville. The work is moving on nicely.

20. **Newton and Conover.** Some improvements have been made and the pastor has a round report.

21. **Old Fort.** Brother Staten has done well and the people want him back.

22. **Sherrill's Ford and Denver.** Brother Addie has been appointed to this charge three times in the last twenty-five years and the people have given him a hearty welcome each time and he is moving on nicely.

23. **Shelby and Brooks.** This has been a good year with Brother Pressley and his people. They have added many to the church and have had an increase in the Centenary.

24. **Statesville and Philadelphia.** Some improvement has been made on this charge and they hope to build a parsonage soon.

25. **West Asheville.** We had hoped to make some change at this point. We have a good piece of property but we need to sell and go to another location. This they hope to do soon.

Our District Conference was held at Marion and our Sunday School and Epworth League Convention was held at Statesville. Both seemed to be a success.

Our Schools

Allen Home had a successful year and opened this season with a large enrollment, under the supervision of the new superintendent, Mrs. Bell.

Douglas Academy is now the property of the North Carolina Conference and we hope the Conference will see fit to build a community school in the near future.

We are thankful to our Heavenly Father for an increase in membership and also \$750. in Centenary. We have tried to live up to our motto: Bear ye one another's burden.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

In presenting this, my second annual report of the District, I would acknowledge first of all my profound gratitude to Almighty God for His goodness to me, in the abiding sense of His love and care through which I have been enabled to perform the duties of my office. I also acknowledge very gratefully the cordial hospitality everywhere accorded me by the pastors, their families and laity at large. I have had the hearty sympathy, confidence and co-operation of the loyal pastors and people, making the work, although that of incessant labor and travel, yet both pleasant and successful. This has been a year of earnest and united work. The preachers have been zealous for the cause of the Master and faithful to the various interests of the church.

At the quarterly meetings on every charge I have inquired carefully into the temporal and spiritual business of the church. I have urged the pastors to conform strictly to the provisions of the Discipline for the support of the various benevolent causes and the support of bishops. I have examined the deeds of the church property and in most cases they conform to the law and form of the Discipline. I have urged that all the church property be well insured.

Education

I have endeavored to stimulate an interest in education of our young people, by distributing catalogues and circulars of our institutions. We point with pride to Bennett College. Prof. Frank Trigg and his strong faculty are doing splendid work. And we stand ready to aid in any way to make this school a power for good.

Young People's Societies

I have labored to emphasize the importance of the Sunday School. Pastors should regularly from their pulpits invite the young people and the adults as well, to attend and urge the parents to send their children, and as often as possible, to accompany them. The lessons should not only be well studied and taught, but pastors, teachers and parents should seek the early conversion and salvation of every child.

The Epworth League well organized and properly conducted, can be made a power in any community; and, as far as possible, the pastor should see that one is organized and maintained in every church.

Spiritual Condition

We are thankful to report that the most of the pastors have worked with intense interest and earnestness for the conversion of sinners and the edification of believers, and that many have professed a hope in Christ and have entered the church. There remains, however, much to be done to make our churches thoroughly spiritual. A revival of the class meetings, faithful pastoral visiting from house to house as well as fervent preaching are still necessary.

I have urged in all the Quarterly Conferences that all the officers at least become subscribers to the Southwestern Christian Advocate, so well edited by Dr. L. H. King and so full of religious and Methodist teaching. We are doing what we can to help make the paper self-supporting.

Ministerial Support

Seeing that many of our pastors with their families are compelled to make many sacrifices and sometimes to suffer untold privations while conscientiously striving to perform their sacred duties, I have endeavored to impress upon the officers and people the important obligation contained in the requirements of the Discipline with regard to ministerial support.

This District is steadily marching onward. We have been contending against intemperance, Sabbath desecration and the tide of worldiness. Our forces have been marshalled against evil of every kind. And in the spirit of John Wesley we trust that we have wrought, suffered and triumphed. Both pastors and people have co-operated with me heartily.

I refrain from naming the charges that ask the return of their pastors for fear that it may look like reflecting upon those where the people have been silent. But I promise you that I will state

facts to the Bishop without prejudice or feeling, and be guided by the Holy Spirit, whom the blessed Saviour declares will teach us all things.

IX. MEMORIALS AND RESOLUTIONS

EPWORTH LEAGUE INSTITUTE

Experience in Epworth League Institutes within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference for two years has brought to the surface several evident facts.

First of these is the evident benefit that would come to the young life of the Conference through these institutes when properly conducted.

Secondly, with proper supervision and direction an Institute such as proposed by the Epworth League Board is practical and can be made a success.

Third. We have within the bounds of the Conference an educational institution amply equipped to furnish a location for such an Institute, and

Fourth. Like Institutes in other Conference areas, held on the campus and in buildings of Methodist schools are proving a success and a marked benefit to the young life of such Conferences and communities.

In view of these facts the District Superintendents of the North Carolina Conference, after a conference in which these facts were thoroughly explored do memorialize the North Carolina Conference to endorse and support such an Institute at Bennett College, cooperating for the same with the Epworth League Board of the Church.

And that to arrange plans and program and details for such an Institute, the North Carolina Conference appoint a Commission known as the Epworth League Institute Commission composed of twelve persons—namely one District Superintendent, one minister and one layman from each of the four districts of the Conference, one of which persons shall be elected chairman of the Commission the same to meet at the call of the chairman to outline work and plans as suggested above.

From the organization of Methodism in America, the work in North Carolina was continued in Virginia, and afterwards in the Virginia and South Carolina Conferences. In the year 1836 the General Conference set up in North Carolina. Its first session opened as a part of the Virginia Conference, but when it adjourned there were two Conferences.

*Facts from the first nine sessions are gleaned from the General Minutes and from the Conference Journal for those years which is now in custody of the North Carolina Conference of the M. E. Church, South.

At this date the Conference had 19459 white members and 3,390 colored. Without consulting the wisdom of the latter, nearly the whole membership became a part of a new church, organized in May, 1845, and called the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Some entered the A. M. E. Church, some the Colored M. E. Church of America; but thousands turned gladly to the bosom of the old Methodist Episcopal Church, as it returned to the State.

At this session a new Conference—the Blue Ridge—was formed, with twelve preachers, 2,839 members and probationers, and 41 church edifices.
