P. I. Wells was elected as statistician. He chose as his assistants, P. F. Johnson, E. I. Swann, Jno. H. Isham.

**Bar of Conference** was made to include the first six rows of seats from the chancel.

**Hour of Adjournment.** By motion of P. I. Wells the hour for adjournment was made twelve-thirty noon and hour for opening eight-thirty A. M.

**Welcome Addresses.** In accordance with the arranged programme, His Honor, the Mayor J. A. Leonard was introduced, who on behalf of city of Lexington brought greeting and welcome to the conference.

R. W. Winchester made response to the address.

Rev. W. G. Anderson, pastor of the Presbyterian Church represented the ministers of Lexington in an address of welcome to which W. E. Hairston made response.

On behalf of the local church S. H. Rhone brought a message of welcome. In the absence of Dr. W. H. Bruce, who was to have responded Bishop Bristol very happily spoke the sentiments of the conference in accepting the assurance of welcome.

**Question One** was called. The Conference has a board of trustees as required by State laws.

**Question Two.** Who has been received by transfer and from what Conference? None.

**Question Fifteen** was called. R. N. Brooks was announced transferred to the West Texas Conference.

**Question Fourteen.** Was the character of each preacher examined? H. L. Ashe, J. A. Laughlin, M. M. Jones, P. J. Cook, District Superintendents of the Greensboro, Western, Wilmington and Winston districts respectively were passed in character and made their report.

The effective elders of the four districts were passed in character and in response to the calling of the roll reported all benevolent claims presented, the number of conversions and accessions also the number South Western Christian Advocates taken.

Ten o'clock Friday morning was made order of the day for the election of delegates to the General Conference. Saturday morning immediately after the minutes are read the presentation of the World Service Programme.

By motion of Secretary a rising vote of thanks was tendered Dr. Allan MacRossie for his attendance and addresses to the Conference and that his name appear in complimentary resolutions.

Motion to adjourn prevailed.

**Thursday Morning Session.**

Devotions were conducted by M. C. Laughlin. M. M. Jones led in prayer. At close of the devotional hour Bishop Bristol delivered an address from the 23rd Psalm. The minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Dr. C. K. Brown of Tennessee Conference was introduced, who pronounced the benediction after the announcements were made by the pastor, P. I. Wells.

Bishop Bristol delivered the morning address from the 51 Psalm. The minutes of the previous session were called for, read and adopted with necessary corrections.

**Question Twelve.** What others have been elected and ordained deacons? None.

**Elisha Howard's Property.** S. A. Peeler presented to the Conference the possibility of selling to the daughter of Elisha Howard its rights in the Howard property. On motion of J. P. Morris the matter was referred to the Conference board of trustees.

The order of the day was called, and the Conference



ordered the Secretary to prepare ballots for the election of General Conference delegates.

D. H. Kearse and R. T. Weatherby were chosen as tellers. The Bishop ordered the first ballot cast. David H. Kearse presented a resolution regarding the Douglas Academy this matter was referred to Conference trustees for consideration.

In reporting monies collected for Conference Minutes "Sinking Fund", the four district Superintendents, H. L. Ashe, Greensboro District; J. A. Laughlin, Western District; P. J. Cook, Winston District; M. M. Jones, Wilm-

ington District assumed responsibility for their respective districts.

By motion of S. A. Peeler a committee was appointed to investigate and locate any errors in reports made to statistician and treasurer effecting conference claimants distributions.

Committee as follows: R. S. Abernethy, P. I. Wells, W. M. Wells, W. G. Lomax.

**Summer Conference Schools.** S. A. Peeler offered a resolution pledging the Conference to the support of a Summer School for the benefit of the men in the various classes of the Conference.

For the purpose of working out details in connection with the Summer School the following committee was appointed: S. A. Peeler, J. P. Morris, R. T. Weatherby, R. W. Winchester and the four district Superintendants ex-officio.

The bishop appointed as members of the board of examiners: S. A. Peeler, J. A. Baxter, R. G. Morris, J. P. Morris, N. J. Pass, G. M. Phelps, J. C. Rush, G. W. Moorehead, W. E. Hairston, R. W. Winchester, R. S. Abernethy.

Dr. J. W. E. Bowen of Gammon Theological Seminary was introduced, who after extending greeting, pronounced the benediction.

### Saturday Morning Session.

Proper devotions were conducted in which Dr. J. W. E. Bowen of Gammon Theological Seminary led in prayer. The minutes of the previous session were read and adopted.

Dr. Wm. Stanton representative of the Board of Conference Claimants was introduced. In course of his address he delivered to the conference a draft from the Board of Conference Claimants to the amount of \$619.55 of which \$4.55 was interest on Annual Conference Investment Fund, \$15.00 from Trust Fund.

**Question Twenty-two** was called. Henry A. Davis bringing parchments from the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church was received into full membership and placed in studies of the third year. By motion of J. P. Morris, Dorsey McRae was granted retired relation. On invitation of the bishop Dr. J. W. E. Bowen addressed the Conference. Dr. L. H. King, editor of South Western

Christian Advocate addressed the Conference making a strong appeal in interest of his paper.

By motion of W. M. Wells the Conference ordered a column placed in Minutes reporting the number of Minutes taken on each district.

The President of the Conference invited Dr. J. C. Sherrill, Dr. Wm. Neal and Dr. F. H. Butler to the platform pursuant to the order of the day, which was the presentation of the ten year programme projected by the Commission on Conservation and Advance.

W. E. Hairston presented a Memorial requesting the General Conference to devise a plan for an adequate financial support of its Theological Schools. Adopted.

The Secretary of the cabinet nominated the members of the respective boards of the Conference.

H. L. Ashe nominated the following names as members of the board of trustees: J. P. Morris, D. H. Kearse, R. W. Winchester, Robert Smith, P. J. Cook, S. F. B. Peace, M. J. Bullock, S. A. Peeler. The Secretary of the Conference was ordered to cast a ballot. The Secretary so announced and the board of trustees was declared elected.

**Question Twenty-five** was called. G. W. Browev, P. I. Wells, R. G. Morris, R. B. Rhyne, W. M. Wells, were elected as triers of appeals.

J. H. Isham and G. W. Byers, reserves.

By motion of W. M. Wells the Conference proceeded to raise a collection for furnishings in the Brook's Memorial Laundry at Allen Home, Asheville. The amount of \$42.50 was raised.

Benediction by F. H. Butler.

### Saturday Afternoon Session.

At the close of the Anniversary of Board of Education for Negroes 4:30 P. M., Bishop Bristol called the Conference to order.

**Question Twenty-nine** was called. What is the conference treasurer's report? R. W. Winchester reported. His report showed an increase of \$1165.00 over last year. The report was adopted. (See report.)

**Question Twenty-eight** was called. What is the Statis-

tician's report? P. I. Wells made his report which was adopted. (See report.)

The Secretary of the cabinet read the report showing the askings from the Conference for the Episcopal Fund. The report was adopted.

By motion of M. M. Jones, H. C. Gannanay was left without an appointment to attend school.

A resolution effecting the sale of Douglas Academy property was read by R. W. Winchester. On motion of H. L. Ashe the Conference ordered the board of Conference trustees to repair the property and put it in fit condition for immediate use. D. H. Kearse made a motion that the trustees be requested to attend to this matter within 30 days.

The proceeds from the Hamlet property amounting to \$117.57 was ordered turned over to Conference stewards for distributions to Conference Claimants.

The report of the Conference stewards was read and adopted. (See report.)

**The Printed Journal.** By motion of the Secretary the printed journal was made the official record of the Sixty-fifth Session of the North Carolina Conference.

**Question Thirty-one** was called. What are the claims on the Conference Funds? (See report.)

**Question Thirty-two** was called. What has been received on these claims? (see report.)

**Question Thirty-six** was called. Where shall the next Conference be held? Robert Smith invited the Conference to convene at Marion, N. C. The Conference voted unanimously to accept the invitation.

The standing committees by motion of R. T. Weatherly were requested to pass in their reports to the Secretary for publication.

The standing committees were nominated by the committee on nomination. The report was adopted. (See report.)

By motion of W. R. Zeigler the Conference ordered the Secretary to print 1200 copies of Conference Minutes.

The Love Feast at 9:30 A. M. Preaching Service at 10:30 A. M., Ordination at 2:30 P. M., after which the appointments will be read was made the order of the day for Sunday.

Benediction—Dr. J. P. Morris.

### Sunday Morning.

According to the order of the day D. Brooks and Dorsey McRay opened the love feast at 9:30 A. M., which proved quite a spiritual blessing to all present.

At 10:30 A. M. the hour for the sermon, Bishop Bristol preached a soul stirring sermon from Jno. 12:32. "If I be lifted up, I will draw all men unto me."

An offering of \$200.00 was taken at the morning service for local benefits.

Benediction—Bishop Bristol.

### Sunday Afternoon Session.

At 2:30 P. M. Bishop Bristol assisted by the four district superintendents, conducted the ordination services, at which time Jno. H. Isham was ordained an elder in the Methodist Episcopal Church.

The Conference Claimants Funds were distributed by Conference Stewards. (See Report.)

Committee on Complimentary Resolutions reported. (See Report.)

R. D. Bethea read resolutions regarding the late Rev. Collett former member of the N. C. Conference.

By motion of J. M. Harris the Secretary was made reporter to the South Western Christian Advocate.

Minutes of the previous session were read and adopted.

In realization of the splendid service rendered by Bishop Bristol for the last two quadreniums and in view of his retirement at the next session of the General Conference, H. L. Ashe made a motion, ammended by R. T. Weatherby that a rising vote of thanks be extended the bishop. Carried.

A motion prevailed that the printed Minutes be approved.

After very touching remarks by Bishop Bristol in response to previous resolutions he led in singing "God Be With You Till We Meet Again." After which D. Brooks led in prayer.

**Question Thirty-five** was called. Where are the Ministers stationed? (See Report.)

The Conference ordered that after the approval of the Journal, ordination service, and reading of appointments the Conference stand adjourned. "Sine die."

### REPORT OF THE GREENSBORO DISTRICT

H. L. Ashe, District Superintendent

Mr. President and Members of the Conference:

Another year, filled with hard work and varied experiences, has passed into unchangeable history. We rejoice over victories won and work accomplished. We have refused to brood over failures, realizing that both failures and successes are now in God's keeping and that His cause cannot ultimately fail. He has not and never will desert His world, and to those who put their trust in Him, victory is assured. His will shall dominate the wills of men. His love shall consume the selfishness of men; His grace shall transform the lives of men. The church shall always be the place of His Kingdom, filled with His glory. And he has called us into partnership with Himself. There is no work like it this side of the pearly gates. While sickness has invaded many of the parsonages, we are happy to report that the Grim Reaper, Death, has not taken away from our ministerial ranks.

The year has been a busy one for superintendent, pastor and people. Being the closing year of the Centenary period, much of our time has been occupied with group meetings and drives looking toward the completion of this great program.

We give a brief summary, leaving detailed report of the charges to the pastors.

**Brown Summit.** Brother H. C. Gannaway was assigned here as pastor and served faithfully until early Spring. For good and sufficient reasons he was relieved to go North, where he has spent much time in the hospital. He has returned apparently in good health, and is now pursuing the College course at Bennett College. Brother Robert McRae has been in charge of the work since that time and has done splendid work. He is a good young preacher and brings a fine report from that charge.

**Caswell.** Brother J. H. Garrett, one of our faithful veteran preachers, has done good work on this charge, and there are hopeful signs of development.

**Empire.** Brother J. B. Meekins is pastor. He has accomplished a splendid work, made material improvements and increased the Benevolence.

**Greensboro East.** Brother W. R. Zeigler is the pastor. He has done magnificent work. The charge has been materially improved and the Centenary collections more than doubled, and the churches are spiritually alive.

**High Street.** Rev. E. D. Petty, pastor. He has successfully marshalled the forces on this charge and lead it "on to victory." The



Centenary collection is the highest in the history of the church. All claims have been fully met.

**St. Matthews.** Rev. R. W. Winchester is still on the job here, doing efficient work along all lines. The full Centenary quota has been raised for this year and all claims met.

**South.** G. W. Byers, pastor. He has accomplished his usual spiritual and material victories, big revivals at each church and many accepting Christ.

**Southeast.** This charge has been supplied by Brother Sidney Green. He has done a good work, increased the membership and more than doubled the Centenary offering.

**Northwest.** W. T. Lomax, pastor. The charge is spiritually alive. The membership is courageous. The new brick church on Warren Street which was erected with a view of a larger donation from the Board of Church Extension than they have thus far been able to get, leaves them very much embarrassed financially, but they are struggling to take care of the situation "and save the day."

**Guilford.** A. H. Newsome, pastor. Brother Newsome is closing his second year here and has stuck to his post of duty, has given his attention to every phase of the work and will report improvements along all lines.

**Leaksville.** Brother W. E. Hairston, one of our young preachers, is making a fine record on this charge. He is giving to this charge a leadership that is "worth-while."

**Newport News, Va.** Rev. D. C. Skeen, pastor. He has been much handicapped on the account of sickness in his home, but has labored to a successful end, and is in the hearts of his people.

**Norfolk, Va.** Brother J. R. McNair, pastor. His health has not been good during the year and he is unable to attend the Conference, but has been very faithful in the discharge of his duties.

**Oxfords and Bullocks.** D. L. Thomas, pastor. He has worked faithfully and successfully, more than doubling the Centenary offering and all the interests carefully looked after.

**Pleasant Ridge, Va.** Supplied by A. B. Leonard. He has stuck to his post of duty and attained some degree of success.

**Ramsuer.** G. W. Morehead, pastor. He has been faithful in the discharge of his duties and has labored hard and brought success.

**Reidsville.** G. M. Phelps, pastor. Brother Phelps proves to be the man to handle a difficult task. Each year of his pastorate on this charge brings to it greater achievements and puts him deeper into the hearts of the people.

**Townsville and Creedmore.** Supplied by Brother E. M. McLeod. He has worked faithfully and brought success along all lines.

**Wentworth.** Supplied by Brother J. M. Joyce. The charge has been carefully looked after and some success attained.

**West Raleigh.** J. M. Harris, pastor. This charge has enjoyed under the leadership of Brother Harris a very successful year. The



church has the largest Sunday School in the district. Every department of the church has been carefully looked after, material improvements have been made on the church, the full Centenary quota raised and the church is closing a successful year.

**Central Randolph.** Bro. F. J. Lee, pastor. He has done a good year's work, improving the church building at St. Peter's, raised the full quota of Centenary money and met all claims. Brother Lee is a good, earnest worker.

**Northeast Greensboro.** Bro. M. McCalum, pastor. He is a college student at Bennett College but the charge has not suffered for attention. The people are loud in their praise of his services.

## WESTERN DISTRICT

J. A. Laughlin, District Superintendent

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

Through the mercy of God I am glad that I am permitted to make my fifth annual report. We started out in the beginning of the year with a better understanding with each other as never before, and reports will show results. We have had good revivals on most of the charges and in spite of the exodus we have a slight increase in membership.

### Summary of the District

This has been a year of church building at Catawba. They got burned out at Brown's Chapel in the early spring, but are building back a beautiful, model church and also remodeling the church at Bulah. Brother Littlejohn has done a great work on this charge.

At Marion, under the leadership of our faithful brother, Rev. Robt. Smith, we have the best and only brick church on the District and they are asking for the next Annual Conference.

At Union Mills, a new point on the Forest City charge, Brother

Isham has built a nice Chapel; also, they are building at Wells Springs.

At Lincolnton, where we have never been able to do much, we are now on the map. Brother Johnson and his people have completed a nice church and have had the best revival in the District—sixty conversions, thirty-odd joined the church.

At King's Mountain Brother Dunham and his people remodeled the church and entertained the District conference nicely.

At Shelby, Brother Pressley has remodeled the church at a cost of \$3,000, and now has the most beautiful church in the District.

At Gastonia, Brother Morris and his people have worked hard, with the hope that they would have had the first unit completed by now, but the home board has been slow to stand by the project. They have 150,000 brick and other material on the ground and will start to build in the spring.

All of the brethren have worked hard and reports will show an increase in Centenary, Episcopal funds and other benevolences.

Our Sunday School and Epworth League Convention and District Conference and adjourned District Conference were all successful.

Our schools, Allen Home and Douglas Academy, had very successful years, and have opened up very hopeful for the future year. Allen Home is now a credited school.

Our motto is still the same, "Bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfil the law of Christ."

#### OUR MINUTE

It takes thirty dollars a minute to run the church Centenary program, and one hundred dollars will run it three minutes and a third, and one thousand dollars will run it thirty-three minutes and a third, and four thousand will run it one hundred and fourteen minutes and one-third, and if we would walk three and one-fourth miles per hour the Western District has carried the world on her shoulders six miles this year. And, Bishop, if I am permitted to work with the same men another year will carry the world service program six miles toward the Kingdom, or report to God the reason why.

#### WILMINGTON DISTRICT

Bishop, Brethren, Members of the North Carolina Conference, and Friends:

It is with thankfulness to God, our Father, whose I am, and whom I serve, that I stand before you this day to report another year's service as District Superintendent of the Wilmington District.

First, we acknowledge the favor of God in that we have had good health, and also my family. All of the pastors on the district have had good health, with one or two exceptions. Death has not

invaded our ranks. We rejoice to say to you that on most of the charges the efforts of the pastors have been successful whether as material improvement or spiritual advancement.

The section of the state in which this district lies is known as the "Cotton Belt." Here the one crop system is largely in vogue.

The people lived through the summer on credit. They had better crops than they expected, which furnished some relief.

### Organizations

The Sunday Schools on the District are better and more thoroughly organized than they have ever been and that is due to the Centenary movement. New schools have been organized and old schools been reorganized, according to the latest ideas of Sunday School work.

Home departments, radle Rolls, Graded Lessons adopted, Teachers Training Classes formed, Adult Bible Classes organized and, in short, better methods of instruction and better Teachers and Superintendents now in our schools than ever before, and owing to this we have brought about a higher standard of efficiency.

### Epworth League

The League is something of a problem. They seem to be a fluctuating quantity. This is true in the reports of the Quarterly Conferences. Some Leagues do well for a while, then stop for a while and then start again. Other Leagues have been doing good work all the year and accomplished good results. Wherever we can find the proper persons for leaders the Leagues do good social and spiritual work. The majority of the Leagues need a great awakening, which only can come through an enlarged vision of their duties and responsibilities to the Lord's cause, and pastors in a large measure to furnish this vision to the young people of their churches.

### Temperance

Our Sunday Schools and Leagues, as well as our churches, emphasize the necessity of total abstinence. Dr. J. N. C. Coggin, our noble temperance man, has done excellent work among us and we are rapidly learning that temperance forms a part of our religion.

### Women Societies

The Woman's Home Missionary societies and the Ladies Aid societies are not barren of good works. They have aided preachers in both material and spiritual works. They have beautified the parsonages, aided in ministerial support, and helped to raise the benevolences; also assisted in all the spiritual meetings of the church. Without our good women the work couldn't prosper.

### Educational Work

There are no schools directly under the auspices of our church on this district. There are many schools of other denominations,

or character. Our people send their children to these schools, some of which are doing good work. I have tried to show our people the great importance of sending their children to our own schools, namely, Bennett College and Kent Home at Greensboro; Asheville Academy and Allen Industrial Home for Girls at Asheville, N. C. These schools are ours and should be patronized by us. Some of our young men and women will attend Bennett College this year from the Wilmington District.

#### Conference Claimants

We have urged that the local Conference claimants fund be raised in proportion to the other ministerial support. We have also urged upon the brethren the necessity of establishing a fund for the benefit of our own Conference, and to this end the Conference resolution was urged. The reports of pastors will show great advance.

About two-thirds of our churches and quite all of our parsonages are properly insured. The excellent financial showing that our churches make is to be wondered at when the methods for raising church funds is considered. The public collection is most largely depended upon for raising money, and when that fails rallies are resorted to, the carrying out of which often brings the church to compromises with the world that are hurtful to the church. Noteworthy efforts are being made to change these unsympathetic and hurtful devices to the systematic and helpful.

#### New Financial Plan

We are hoping, praying and working to see the day when there will be as much business demonstrated in the financial affairs of our church as there is in other lines of our life work, but it is hard to get our churches to see that system is business and without it we must fail in our work. Yet, we have succeeded in having our new financial plan adopted in several of our charges and in each one the success is admirable. We think that in the near future the house-to-house canvass for both ministerial support and benevolences will be the acknowledged successful plan for our District.

Every interest of the church has been looked after and every cause has been presented. We have not been able to meet every requirement, but if, in considering what we have to report, the struggle under which it has been accomplished be taken into account, the year has been one of great success. Some work worthy of special mention has been done at each place, but since the temporal betterments and the spiritual growth will appear in the tabulated reports, I pass over that.

This District is steadily marching onward. We have been contending against intemperance, Sabbath desecration and the tide of worldliness. Our forces have been marshalled against evil of every kind. And in the spirit of John Wesley we trust that we have wrought, suffered and triumphed. Both pastors and people have co-operated with me heartily.

I refrain from naming the charges that ask the return of their pastors for fear that it may look like reflecting upon those where the people have been silent. But I promise you that I will state

facts to the Bishop without prejudice or feeling, and be guided by the Holy Spirit, whom the blessed Saviour declares will teach us all things.

#### Material Improvement

The Sunday Schools, Epworth Leagues, Ladies' Aid, and Home Missionary Societies are in good shape and doing excellent work. We are proud of the work accomplished by these important auxiliaries of the church.

#### Education

The educational facilities for our people are better than ever before and in a great measure our people are taking advantage of their opportunities. Yet there are not as many boys and girls in

our schools as should be. I am trying to teach the importance of Christian education throughout my district. Bennett College has made wonderful improvements for the last few years and is fast becoming one of the leading institutions in the South.

Dr. Frank Trigg, by the help of the Board of Education for Negroes, is making things go at this institution. I am advising the boys and girls to attend Bennett College.

Time will not allow me to tell of the two homes—Kent Home and Allen Industrial Home—where our girls can get the best of training under those God-sent women who are making so much sacrifice for our people.

#### Southwestern

We believe that the Southwestern Christian Advocate should be in the homes of all our people. I find where the people read this paper we have less trouble with them in carrying out the program of the church than we do with those that do not read it. Therefore, I feel it my indispensable duty to get subscribers to such a valuable periodical.

#### Personal

We do not believe that God is locked up in the sky parlors of the universe and is incapable or indifferent concerning the welfare of His people, but we believe that there is an intelligent and powerful personality that is interested in us and accepts and uses us in the development of His plans. Such being our faith, we are trying to connect up with Him and co-operate with Him in the salvation of the world. Again, while we are trying to transform the people one by one, we also feel it our duty to remove the social and political ills which hinder the spread of the Kingdom, and may I say in this connection that one of the most potent forces for evil among the people has been the habit of liquor drinking. **REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ALLEN HOME**

We, your committee to visit Allen Home, were not permitted to visit the Home in a body, but have made sufficient inquiries to acquaint ourselves with the following information:

The Home is doing very proficient work under the leadership of Miss Louise Bell, Superintendent.

There are three splendid buildings on the ground, all in very good condition and very well equipped.

Some improvements have been made on the buildings and grounds. Necessary fire escapes have been placed on all buildings. Tennis and basketball courts have been made for recreation and play.

We find further that the school has an efficient corps of instructors, all of whom have met the requirement of the state law as applied to certificates. And, too, the curriculum has been raised sufficiently to place it on the accredited list, thereby standardizing the high school work.

We also observed the laundry is greatly in need of more modern equipment in order that the girls may do the necessary laundering.

The boys have recently been eliminated, making it strictly a school for girls.

We recommend to the Conference that we give the Home our moral support unreservedly, and that we do all we can at once in a financial way to improve the laundry building and get the necessary equipment.

## IX. MEMORIALS AND RESOLUTIONS

---

### TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH

WHEREAS, the Methodist Episcopal Church has repeatedly indicated its interest in, and concern for, the theological schools of the Church, see Book of Discipline paragraph 456, Section 1, "It is the object of the Board of Education to serve as the officially authorized agency of the Methodist Episcopal Church in behalf of ministerial and general education," etc. Paragraph 463, Section 5: "The theological schools of the Church shall exist for the benefit of the whole Church," etc., and

WHEREAS, the Methodist Episcopal Church makes nowhere any provision in its financial plan for the support of said theological schools, and

WHEREAS, the theological schools provide educational opportunity at inconsiderable cost to candidates for the Methodist ministry, furnishing tuition and room rent free; and

WHEREAS, other philanthropic and educational interests have been allowed to take precedence in public thought over the interests of the theological schools, so that they have been excluded from any adequate share even in the Church's public collection for education, and

WHEREAS, no one of the large Educational Foundations under existing regulations has apparently any provision for aiding denominational theological education, and

WHEREAS, not only the future of the Church but the hope of a Christian civilization for America and the world is dependent upon a trained spiritual leadership,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That we hereby petition the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church to provide some plan for an adequate financial support of its Theological Schools, made imperative by the ever increasing demands of the Church for such leadership.

---

WHEREAS, in the kind Providence of God the North Carolina Conference has for 8 years been blessed with the Episcopal supervision of Bishop Frank M. Bristol, of Chatanooga, Tenn., one of the ablest Bishops, greatest preacher in Methodism, and

WHEREAS, under his careful supervision, wise counsel, great sermons and able addresses the Conference has reached a degree of success unprecedented in its history, and

WHEREAS, at the coming General Conference he retires from Episcopal activities and will be with us no more as such,

THEREFORE RESOLVE, That we acknowledge our debt of gratitude to him for his great leadership and pledge him our prayers through the remainder of his life.

### XI. HISTORICAL VIEW SINCE ORGANIZATION IN 1836

From the organization of Methodism in America, the work in North Carolina was continued in Virginia, and afterwards in the Virginia and South Carolina Conferences. In the year 1836 the General Conference set up in North Carolina. Its first session opened as a part of the Virginia Conference, but when it adjourned there were two Conferences.

\*Facts from the first nine sessions are gleaned from the General Minutes and from the Conference Journal for those years, which is now in custody of the North Carolina Conference of the M. E. Church, South. At this date the Conference had 19495 white members and 3390 colored. Without consulting the wisdom of the latter, nearly the whole membership became part of a new church, organized in May, 1845, and called the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Some entered the A. M. E. Church, some the Colored M. E. Church of America; but thousands turned gladly to the bosom of the old Methodist Episcopal Church, as it returned to the State.

At this session a new Conference—the Blue Ridge—was formed, with twelve preachers, 2339 members and probationers, and 41 church edifices.
