Journal of the Daily Proceedings of the North Carolina Conference

SIXTY-EIGHTH SESSION

The Sixty-eighth Session of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church to be convened in St. Stephens Methodist Episcopal Church in Madison, North Carolina, held its opening session at Bennett College for Women in Greensboro, North Carolina, Bishop Wilbur P. Thirkield presiding.

On the morning of October 27, 1926, at 9 o'clock, the Conference was called to order and the Bishop led in appropriate devotions, following which he addressed the Conference. Talks were made by Mr. David Jones, recently appointed President of Bennett College for Women, and by Mrs. Jones, wife of the President. G. M. Phelps, District Superintendent of the Wilmington District, made remarks. Dr. B. M. Powell, Field Representative of the Board of Pensions and Relief, was introduced. He addressed the Conference.

S. A. Peeler was chosen Secretary. He named J. E. Brower

and G. H. Caldwell as assistant secretaries.

The Conference voted the adoption of the new Pension system. H. L. Ashe offered a resolution which was seconded by R. T. Weatherby and approved by the Conference. (See Resolutions.)

Question 15 was called.

H. L. Ashe passed in character and reported the Greensboro District.

G. M. Phelps was passed in character and reported the Wilmington District.

Mr. Richard B. Harrison was introduced. He recited, to the delight of the Conference, Little Brown Baby.

The first session of the Conference closed with a prayer by S. A. Peeler and the benediction by J. P. Morris.

The Conference held the afternoon session in St. Stephens Church in Madison. Devotions were conducted by the Bishop. J. M. Harris led in prayer.

Question 15 was continued.

J. A. Baxter passed in character and reported the Winston District.

Checks were announced: From Board of Pensions and Relief, \$612.35; Book Concern, \$1251; Chartered Fund, \$40.

These were authorized by the Conference to be handed to the Treasurer of the Conference for collection and distribu-

tion.

R. W. Winchester, Treasurer, appointed D. L. Thomas, A. G. Jenkins, J. P. Morris, J. C. Rush and W. T. Lomax to assist him.

P. I. Wells, Statistician, appointed W. M. Wells, E. I. S.

Swann, P. F. Johnson and J. H. Isham to assist him.

The characters of the pastors of the four districts were

passed and the pastors made their reports.

The Conference fixed the hour of meeting to be 9 o'clock in the morning. The session closed with the benediction by W. A. C. Hughes.

At the evening session P. I. Wells presided. R. G. Morris led in prayer. The address of the evening was made by Dr. W. A. C. Hughes, Field Secretary of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension. The benediction was pronounced by Dr. J. D. Chavis.

Second Day

Thursday morning at 9 o'clock the Bishop took the chair and led the devotions. A. G. Jenkins led in the prayer.

The Bishop, assisted by the District Superintendents, ad-

ministered the Lord's Supper.

The Secretary read the minutes of the previous session

and they were approved.

Welcome addresses on behalf of the village were made by His Honor Thomas D. Meador, the mayor of Madison; on behalf of the churches by Rev. T. J. Rogers of the M. E. Church, South, and on behalf of the St. Stephens M. E. Church by J. N. Moseley.

Responses were made by R. W. Winchester, D. H. Kearse

and Bishop Wilbur P. Thirkield.

The bar of the Conference was fixed to include the first four rows of seats fronting the pulpit.

N. J. Pass passed in character and reported the Western

District.

J. E. Brower was appointed press reporter.

Question One was called.

The Conference has a Board of Trustees as the state law requires. The Conference voted to require S. A. Peeler, Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, to give bond in the sum of \$1000.

Dr. J. D. Chavis and J. A. Foust were introduced.

The Conference adjourned with the benediction by J. P. Morris.

At the evening session the secretary of the cabinet gave the list of committees appointed by the cabinet. (See list.)

The Conference was addressed by Drs. J. D. Chavis and J. A. Foust. Mrs. P. I. Wells was very happy in the rendition of a solo.

Third Day

On Friday morning at 9 o'clock the Conference opened with devotions. E. D. Petty led in prayer. The Bishop gave a devotional address on The Ministry of Silence.

The Secretary read the minutes of the previous sessions

and they were approved.

On behalf of the Greensboro District P. I. Wells presented a purse to H. L. Ashe, retiring District Superintendent. He responded.

Question 4 was called.

James W. Hall's Elder's Orders from A. M. E. Z. Church were recognized and he was received into full membership of the Conference and placed in the studies of the third year.

Question 5 was called.

(a) Charles G. Bynum and Benj. W. Stewart were received and placed in studies of the first year.

Ouestion 6 was called.

(a) Edward M. McLeod and Geo. W. Patterson were con-

tinued on trial in studies of the second year.

On motion by S. A. Peeler the Conference reconsidered the action requiring all undergraduates to attend summer school. The requirement was made to include all who are not Students of Gammon Theological Seminary.

The Boys' Conference as ordered by the last Annual Conference was conducted by R. T. Weatherby. Dr. J. D. Chavis led in prayer. William Dalton on behalf of the boys of Madison made the visitors welcome. Oscar Whitfield made response. The Bishop addressed the boys.

The Secretary was instructed by the Conference to respond

to a letter of greetings from H. C. Gannaway.

The Conference adjourned with the benediction by M. J. Bullock.

In the afternoon the Boys' Conference reassembled, N. M. Martin presiding. Devotions were conducted. S. F. B. Peace led the prayer.

Mr. David Jones and R. T. Weatherby addressed the Conference. Mr. Richard B. Harrison, the elecutionist, recited one of his masterpieces, to the delight of the Conference. Dr. J. D. Chavis from the East Tennessee Conference delivered a sermon.

William Wells presided at the evening session. J. W.

Simpson led in prayer. R. G. Morris made the address.

A pulpit made by Professor Watts, principal of the Negro Public School of Madison, was presented to St. Stephen M. E. Church. D. H. Kearse on behalf of the church and Conference made remarks.

Benediction by the Rev. Mr. Watt.

Fourth Day

Saturday morning's session opened with devotions led by the Bishop. The Ten Commandments were repeated by the Conference while the choir chanted, as laid down in our order of service.

The reading of the minutes of the previous session was not

completed.

Under Question 8 (a) Benjamine F. Gleaves was admitted into full connection and elected to be ordained Deacon.

The case of S. J. Hayden was again referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.

The Conference requested the pastors to furnish all names of conference claimants' children who live on their respective charges.

A resolution touching on the presidency of Bishop Thirkield over the area in which our Conference is situated was read by J. A. Baxter and adopted by the Conference. (See Resolutions.)

The Bishop's salary was fixed at a sum equal to 11-8 per cent of the pastors' salary.

R. W. Winchester was chosen Treasurer for the ensuing year.

P. I. Wells was chosen Statistician for the ensuing year.

Daniel Brooks was chosen official visitor to Bennett Col-

lege for Women.

The District Superintendents with a commission to be appointed by the cabinet were authorized by the Conference to sell any property that has ceased to be used for church purposes, and to apply \$2000 of funds so realized to our church at Norfolk.

The Committee on Education reported. (See Report.)

President Jones presented a plan for self-denial week for Bennett. It was adopted. The time fixed for the execution of this plan is the week ending February 12.

The report of the Committee on Evangelism was made.

(See Report.)

The time was extended by vote of the Conference.

The Committee on World Service reported.

Profs. J. A. McRae and W. B. Winchester and the Rev. Mr. Campbell, and Mrs. Mamie McLaurin and Miss Belle Jones were introduced.

N. M. Martin was appointed to collect for the Southwest-

ern Christian Advocate.

C. E. Howard was taken from the supernumerary and placed in effective relation.

A collection of \$172 was made for the minutes of 1925-1926. O. G. Covington's local Deacon's Orders from the A. M.

E. Z. Church were recognized.

E. G. Crumedy's Deacon's Orders from the A. M. E.

Church were recognized.

The four District Superintendents were made collectors of the fund for publication of the minutes by order of the Conference.

The Conference voted that after reading the minutes and the appointments they would stand adjourned.

The Bishop pronounced the benediction.

Fifth Day

On Sunday morning love feast was conducted by D.

Brooks, W. J. Bullock, W. W. Pope and D. McRae.

The Bishop preached at 10:30 a.m. and 3 p.m. He ordained as Deacons B. F. Gleaves, Calvin Gidney and William G. Hoover; as Elder, Robert McRae.

Sunday evening following the reading of the appointments

W. M. Wells delivered the closing sermon.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORTS

REPORT OF THE GREENSBORO DISTRICT

H. L. Ashe, District Superintendent

Bishops and members of the Conference, I am blessed with the privilege to come before you with my sixth and final report as Superintendent of the Greensboro District. I am, as you are, profoundly grateful to our Heavenly Father (whose we are, and without whom we can do nothing), for His fatherly care over us.

We have labored together these six years in a common cause, dear to us all, and can report some success. Ideals have not been reached, but earnest efforts have been put forth toward them.

Material Growth

All details will be seen in the pastors' reports. During the six years two new churches have been built and two in process of erection. Two new parsonages have been built and occupied, and one parsonage bought and almost paid for. Many of the charges have made substantial improvement, which add much to the material appearance and to the enhancement of the church property. This has been done for the most without embarrassing debts, only one church seriously handicapped with indebtedness.

Education

The outlook for higher education was never so bright as it is at the tick of the watch. The State of North Carolina has forged itself ahead of all the Southern States in a program of education for our people. Standardized high schools have sprung up in various sections of the state, equipped with the best teachers available. The Board of Education of our church and the Woman's Home Missionary Society, under the leadership of Bishop Thirkield, who is always alert for the best things for our people, have worked out a program of education which is destined to prove a mighty advance in the training of our young women for larger usefulness. Our Bennett College that has stood for years as the lighthouse of the North Carolina Conference has been transformed into a College for Women. Prof. David T. Jones, one of Greensboro's favored sons, has been elected President. He is associated by a strong faculty, all college women, representing the best schools in the country. Thus a new epoch has begun in Christian Education for our people.

World Service

The district records show that some gains have been made each year. And while this has been a very hard year financially on account of economical conditions, yet reports indicate that we will at least hold our own. The fact is world service is coming into its own. The people generally are accepting it as a fixed fact in their church life, and are giving it a more sympathetic and generous support. In 1925 there was a falling income at Chicago which was alarming. At the closing of the fiscal year, May 31, 1926, there was an increase of more than \$200,000—this was heartening to the entire church. The Greensboro District has a large share in this wonderful achievement. A number of charges on the district are coming up this year one hundred per cent.

Spiritual Growth

The spiritual condition of the district is by no means what we desire, but marked progress along modern methods in spiritual evangelism may be noted in many of the charges. There has been a more sympathetic study of the Christian life as it relates to our fellowmen. The results of which there is a greater interest in community life. Personal evangelism is taking hold of the hearts of the people. The need is for a deeper interest in our fellowmen, and a more dilligent application of our time and talent to the study of God's Word. We must understand that our Christ came into the world to save all men, and that He must do it through the Christian church. World salvation is the objective-world service is destined to save every man and all society-the highest, lowest, worst and best shall be given a chance. The church should rapidly come to the place of leadership in the world. The many problems with which the church is confronted require strong spiritual influence and power. We live in an awful day. The world is reeking in sin; the clouds of immorality are lowering upon us; dens of infamy and cesspools of iniquity infest the great centers that throb with human life. Womanhood is being reduced—man power is weak--everywhere there are signs of ruin and decay with much religious indifference. This condition demands strong ministerial leadership. Men called and consecrated-men full of courage. The Redeemer's kingdom cannot be advanced by half-heartedness. While it is a dark day, the courageous Christian leader sees a brighter tomorrow. There is still the sound of the Master, "Go ye into all the world," and the commission is to every creature. Still rings the declaration of John Wesley, "The world is my parish." Such faith takes no denial, but looks opposition in the face and cries, "It must be done."

Brethren, the task may be hard, but the duty is ours. Let us go to it, and stick to it with a determination of iron—a will of steel—and a heart of love. Preach a gospel fraught with life, light and power till Christianity shall have its mild and gentle sway, and peace shall plant its olive wreath in every nation.

"This is our faith tremendous— Our wild hope who should scorn That in the Name of Jesus The world shall be new born."

REPORT OF THE WINSTON DISTRICT

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

I come to make this my second annual report after another year's toil and constant travel. Now as we drop anchor and pitch tent here in this city of brotherly love, we feel grateful for the way God has dealt with us. I dare say there is to be found among us a common experience as its found wherever preachers meet, an experience in common with the great peacher to the Gentiles. We have been in journeyings often, in perils of waters, in perils by the heathen, in perils in the city and in the wilderness, and in peril by untrue brethren; in weariness and painfulness; in watchings and fastings often. Besides the things that come from without there comes upon me daily the care of the churches. To this end, Bishop, I with the rest of the brethren come to report on the care of the churches; I, in particular, those of the Winston District.

We are grateful in that the Angel of Rest has not broken the ministerial ranks of the district, though various diseases have intercepted our line of march. We are especially happy that the church has so arranged its program that you, our resident Bishop and chifetain, could preside at this session. Your presence does as heretofore shed a wholesome influence over us, and your brotherly admonitions seem to give us an undaunted zeal that arms us for

the affray.

In rendering this report, Bishop, we are fully conscious of the fact that our ideal has not been obtained. Yet with a degree of modetsy we feel that some progress has been made as compared with our previous report. Painfully conscious of our former blunders we have profited thereby and have made amends.

The Group Meeting

Early in the year we called in conference at South High Point our district stewards and chairmen of the local World Service Councils, and there by carefully arranged programs endeavored to lay before them the blueprint of the year's work with specifications attached; laying stress not only upon the necessity of strong foundation laying, but gave even the minutest details from cellar to attic. To these plans the majority gave their hearty approval. There was no reason for me to suspect any diversion from these plans, but I did the awful presumptuous act of sending circular letters to the brethren as a kind of follow up method, reminding them of some of the essentials of the program that must not be neglected or overlooked.

Welfare of the Brethren and Care of the District My First Concern

Twelve months ago, Bishop, we were all assigned our work for the ensuing year. As is true of all conferences, many of us got what we didn't want—so did many of the congregations—but suffice it to say we all got a place to work. And my task has been to encourage the brethren to see roses that may bloom and give of their fragrance and beauty to the surroundings that to begin with were thorny and unpromising. And to those that have been faithful to preach the word in and out of season there has been a veritable fulfillment of Isaiah's prophecy, as reports will show—"The

word has prospered in the thing whereunto it was sent." They have gone even beyond their expectation, for instead of the thorn there has come up the fir tree, and instead of the briar has come up the myrtle tree. Many went forth sowing in tears but have come today bearing the precious sheaves.

Locating Lost Territory

We have not been permitted to see churches grow up overnight, and a great ingathering of the people for which we have so often prayed, but on tiptoes and abated breath we have watched St. Andrew grow under the transforming influence of my illustrious predecessor. We note with pride the gradual development of a strong charge in the foothills of Virginia under the untiring efforts of that tall, dark son of Anak, who is tying his people to him with bands of love, and follow him with devotion not because of the brightness of his intellect but because of the bigness of his soul. These two instances along with others give signs of a gradual growth, but the brightness of these do not dispel gloom that gathers as we note the places where once there was the glad shout of victory and the solemn amen, but now there is the old deserted house of God dilapidated, "Icabod" written thereon-"departed glory." It is true that the people have left, but there is the property of much value laying there that belongs to the Methodist Episcopal Church which is not needed in that particular locality. Why not have it disposed of and the proceeds utilized to better advantage? On this district I have found property in Concord, the old Cherry Street property near Lexington, Mt. Sinai near Madison (this we are hoping to reclaim), Fairview beyond Asheboro, property near Mitchell-in searching the records a deed is found that has no revertable clause in it which makes it still our property. One parsonage that is now claimed by a family that claims ownership because her mother boarded a preacher some years ago. In this case we have asked the courts to dislocate the illegal owners and give back to the church its property. Which case is still pending.

Bennett College

On our district we have no church school but well equipped publics schools with fine corps of teachers. But I have noted a very small percentage of our own young men and women employed in the high schools, the reason for which is that few have had the required training demanded by the State Board of Education; consequently the bringing in of teachers from other states. To remedy this condition the new Bennett College for Women has come to us freighted with the highest standard and greatest possibilities, bespeaking the noblest achivements that have ever come to the Negro women, not only of the Old North State but for those that inhabit the realm between New York and Atlanta. This achievement we hail with much rejoicing and have pledged thereto our unstinted support.

Young People's Work-Epworth League and S. S. Institute and Boys' Conference

There is a definite movement on in the church at large to corral its youth. That this might be effectively done, a very intensive as well as extensive educational program has been put on in every department, and wherever there has been an adherence to the program there has been a healthy, steady growth in the adult as well as in young life of the church. This we have always coveted for the youth of our district or parish. This wish could be fully gratified through the Epworth League and Sunday School Institute if made to function rightly. We have done our best to foster its existence throughout the district, but it continues to weaken yearly. Searching for the cause of its continued pining away I find it to be suffering from a dreadful wound administered by the G. U. O. P. K.—"The Grand United Order of Progress Killers." Each member of this order is armed with a weapon more deadly than the Italian staletto, or the poison arrows of the jungle-man. It is that awful weapon of "indifference."

We have the same high hopes and aspirations for our boys' conference. The church is calling as does the country at large—

Bring me men to match my mountains, Bring me men to match my plains— Men with empires in their purpose, And new eras in their brains.

Bring me men to match my rivers,
Continent cleavers, flowing free,
Drawn by the eternal madness
To be mingled with the sea;
Men of oceanic impulses,
Men whose moral currents sweep
Toward the wild infolding ocean
Of an undiscovered deep.
Men who feel the strong pulsation
Of the Central Sea, and then
Time their currents to its earth throbs—
Bring me men!

Through the Boys' Conference the prayer of J. G. Holland must be answered. God give us men. The time demands strong minds, great hearts, true faith and willing hands.

> Men whom the lust of office does not kill; Men whom the spoils of office can not buy; Men who possess opinions and a will; Men who have honor; men who will not lie.

If the country needs such men the church says, "Bring me the boys, that I may bring them in touch with the Creator of men; that they may have Isaiah's experience of seeing Him in His beauty, and undergo the transformation as is brought about by coming in contact with the holy fires upon the altar; let them like Samuel

abide in the church, that when the call comes for larger and nobler service they may be in position to say, "Speak, Lord, thy servant heareth."

Through the boys' conference we hope to convince him that the church sees more in him than a mere bunch of nerves; it thinks of him as possibilities untold and unmeasurable; also to have him realize that as much as the church is sorely in need of him, he needs the church more. We had hoped for and planned large things for our boys at our district conference, but what we failed in then we hope to gain here at the seat of the Annual Conference.

World Service

In these my final remarks I can truthfully say all causes have been presented. At the close of my first official round I worked out the prorated amounts of ministerial support, apportioned General Conference expenses and World Service askings, after which I gave myself unreservedly to the matter of urging the entire amounts raised. And where possible I helped the brethren raise their World Service.

In many instances where the pastors felt themselves responsible for the raising of the entire amounts and laid their plans for such, you will note a well balanced report. There are some who felt the urge to raise only pastor's salary; upon this phase they laid much stress—and distress on others. Feeling duty bound to obey the first law of nature, viz., self-preservation, but when it comes to the matter of others' welfare they are sure to refer you

to hymn 92, "The Lord will provide."

When it comes to World Service, the lever and fulcrum for lifting the burdens of a sorrowing world, I know the heartaches that have come to you, Bishop, as one of the chief pastors, as is evidenced by your letters of appeal not only to the superintendents but to each pastor; for I have and do feel the same. I have done my utmost to have the brethren see the value of making weekly collections and monthly reports, and the advisability of having each department of the church share in this responsibility, espe-

cially the Sunday school.

I have asked each charge for an increase over last year's giving. This they have promised and of course I am expecting it. First, because of the promise; second, because of the district pride of the men; third, because as ministers and laymen they have begun to realize that in answering the challenge, "Who will go for us?" The most tanglo.e way for us to go is on greenback and on eagle wings, thus answering, "Send me." When our reports are all in, Bishop, after a hard year's work of earnest toil, we hope you will not be disappointed in your expectation, but that you will see some evidences of our endeavors to stand nobly by you in your efforts to put your area in position that you will not be ashamed, and that you will at least see that our group are as eager to answer the call of the old church as that of our native land and country.

REPORT OF THE WESTERN DISTRICT

Dear Fathers and Brethren:

Not by lot nor chance, nor accident, am I privileged to present this my third annual report as District Superintendent of the Western District, but by the gracious favor of a kind and loving Father—the well ordered train of Divine Providence to whom I bow in grateful acknowledgement.

I am grateful to Him, not alone for life and reasonable health, but for the opportunity of serving Him through the great task given

me by the church of which we are a part.

These duties, in some instances exacting and difficult, I have tried at all times to perform faithfully and efficiently to the best of my ability. On every charge within the bounds of my district (with few exceptions) I have held four quarterly conferences. Into many of the homes of our members I have entered prayerfully and earnestly urging them and pleading with them to faitfully and cheerfully accept the great program of the general church and to unswervingly do their part in putting that program over.

But for the loyal co-operation of the pastors and their wives the success which we have been able to achieve would have been impossible. At no time during the years I have been permitted to serve on the district have I enjoyed so profound an expression of brotherly love and sublime fellowship in the work of the kingdom than has been mine this year. We have understood each other, and like good fellow yokemen we have pulled together in our determined efforts to carry into execution the plans of our great church in all lines for the widening of its borders and its world wide program.

Leaving to these faithful pastors the honor I feel that they deserve to report in detail their work as called for by the Discipline, I will not burden you with any attempt to refer specifically to each except to repeat that all have done their best under varied and trying circumstances attending their respective charges and fields of labor.

Personal Evangelism

This has been our theme throughout the length and breadth of the district. The results attending these personal efforts abundantly justify the wisdom of you, my beloved Bishop, in making this a matter of first importance within the bounds of your area. The district has had more members added to our church, and a greater number brought by divine grace into the kingdom, than in many years prior, for all of which we rejoice with you, Bishop, and give glory to God.

Church Records

Realizing that the very inaccurate manner in which many of our church records have been kept has vitiated our statistics and has made deterioration of our growth in membership appear, so I have urged in all of the churches that records, conforming to the requirements of the Discipline, and prepared by our own Book Concern, be immediately secured and accurately kept. This is of supreme importance as an efficient means of accounting for and taking care

of the many accessions during the present year, as well as those of previous years.

We are also urging that a correct record of all church accounts be kept, and careful notations made of the purposes for which collections are taken and moneys expended.

Revivals

In reporting our work pertaining to "personal evangelism" we did not make it clear that this has been within the bounds of the

Western District a year of great revivals.

Almost every church has been marvelously blessed with revivals that reached the souls and stirred the hearts of men, women and children, many of whom yielded to the gentle pleadings of the Holy Spirit, accepted Christ as their Saviour, joined the redeemed hosts, entered into His service and are clothed in their right mind.

Not in many years has there been such a Pentecostal awakening on this the Western District as has been witnessed this year. Truly, the kingdom of the blessed Christ is extending its borders in the

hearts of men.

We acknowledge with deep gratitude the able, scholarly and efficient assistance rendered in many of these revival meetings by Dr. M. T. J. Howard, Brothers Withrow, Rhyes, Brower, Smith, Lomax and Adams, and others whom the Lord used mightily in these great efforts.

World Service

Determined under God to make this the banner district, in point of World Service collections, we enthusiastically went to our appointments at the close of the last session of the annual conference.

No task has been shirked in our efforts to "make good" this determination. From an economic point of view this year has been unusual, especially so in the farming or agricultural centers of our district. The drought which threatened the complete failure of the farms was finally broken, but too late to make a crop sufficiently large to offset the slump in prices of cotton. Our people, although aroused as never before to intelligent giving for this and other causes of our church, have faced unparalleled reverses, and while they have given willingly of that which has been left them, the amount given has fallen below their pledges and expectations. A wail of financial depression comes up from the farmers, whose most conservative estimate of what their crops would net them have fallen short.

Yet out of all of these untoward circumstances we have all done our best, and if our reports show no perceptable increase it is consoling to know that we have no appreciable decrease, if indeed we

have not fully held our own.

Profoundly grateful to our Father in heaven for reasonable health and strength to serve the great church, and through it serve Him who has bought us with His blood, I submit to you, Bishop and brethren, the foregoing as a faithful accounting of my stewardship as District Superintendent, and fellow laborers with my brethren and with my God on the Western District.

REPORT OF THE WILMINGTON DISTRICT

Dear Bishop, Most Esteemed and Beloved Brethren in Christ:

I consider it my first duty not to waste the valuable time of this Conference in commending the heroic work done by the men of the Wilmington District, which speaks louder for itself than any one can speak for it. Therefore it shall be mine to mention in part the work done and leave the same to commend itself.

At the close of the conference last year a few of the men met, before leaving the seat of the conference, and arranged with the District Superintendent a meeting of all of the pastors, accompanied by their District Stewards, to be called within three weeks after the annual conference. A few days after reaching home the men were notified, and on the appointed day almost every man was present, and those who were not asked to be informed at once of the steps taken that they might work harmoniously with the plans of the district.

In this meeting we discussed first our reports for the past year. We were elated beyond mentioning that we had been successful in nearly doubling our World Service giving. It served as a stimulant for us to make even greater efforts for this year. We resolved that we would beat ourselves. We have done it. While we were pleased with our World Service gain, we were entirely displeased with our one-sided report. We were confident that the World Service had not been over-emphasized; at the same time we were also confident that the other causes had not been emphasized enough.

It was the opinion of the ministers there assembled that the people if properly informed would take care of every interest of the church. It was agreed to spare no pains in informing ourselves through every available source possible, and to unselfishly give ourselves to the cause of the church and Christ's kingdom, so that not one stone within our reach might be left unturned.

In the second and third quarterly conferences the following subjects have been discussed after careful consideration, namely, church records, the use of hymnals, the sacredness of the Lord's Supper, and personal evangelism.

We have been helped greatly this year for our evangelistic endeavors through the re-reading of Dr. Hannan's Book on Evangelism. Personal Evangelism by George B. Dean, The East Windows by Luccock, The Christ of the Indian Roads by Stanley Jones, and by the use both in private and family devotion the book written by our own Bishop W. P. Thirkield. We have gone from our studies daily with a growing passion for souls. We have met with some success but not at all satisfactory. We are in the majority yet, who have not grasped the idea of personal work, but still wait for the old time revival, characterized by a great demonstration. Therefore it has been necessary to spend most of our time in trying to change the idea of the Christians with whom the sinners have to live.

To illustrate: One morning when I had finished preaching I extended the invitation as usual to the unsaved, a young man well in his teens came to the altar seemingly in a penitent mood (observing from his facial expression). While in the midst of the effort to get him in the church an officer of the church arose, stating that

they did not take in any one until they got religion. Such are the difficulties we have to face when decisions are gained in any other way than that of the old time way. Because of this condition we have not weakened in the least in our efforts to reach the unsaved.

Conference Claimants: This has been a matter of great concern with us. We appreciate the fact that whatever our conference is our fathers have made it so. It was through their sacrificial labors that churches have been planted in almost every section of the state. Many of you no doubt under the sound of my voice have trudged your way through all kinds of weather, after having left your homes with but little for your families to go upon. Most honored and beloved fathers, may I assure you that this has not escaped our notice; we fully realize our indebtedness to you. Therefore with heartfelt sympathy and increased interest we come from our different fields of labor made possible by your untimely efforts, not with as much as you need, nor with as much as we wish to bring, but with more than we brought last year, and with a determination not to be content until a sufficient amount is raised each year.

You are not to think, sirs, that the other causes have been neglected. I have placed the greater emphasis on the previous mentioned because of their seeming greater need. But be it known unto you that every cause has been presented, to which the good people on the Wilmington District have liberally responded.

We have come to the seat of this conference feeling that a great work has been accomplished this year, and a greater work is in progress. We have done some church building this year. A handsome brick church is now near completion at Rowland, manned by Rev. S. F. B. Peace. The church at Maxton under the wise leadership of Brother R. D. Bethea has been moved to the rear of the lot, giving space for a more modern structure. As to the improvement of property much of that has been done and will be mentioned in the pastors' reports.

I think I ought to mention here the fine spirit which has been found among the brethren throughout the year. In all of our gatherings (and they have been many) there has been such a fine spirit evidenced that it has brought favorable comment from members of

other churches as well as our own.

I shall mention further only one more of our district meetings, namely, the District Conference. This was not given over to the preaching of old sermons, and delivering of old addresses, but we selected from our group men who are doing the job, and gave to them the task of speaking to us along the lines they had been successful in putting over.

We had discussed Personal Evangelism, Stewardship, Systematic Giving and Education. In considering the last named subject Bennett College was included. A strenuous effort has been made on the part of many to do their part in helping to make it a

success

We were pleased to have visit our District Conference Dr. L. H. King. We had been trying for some time to get all of our Unit Leaders to read the Southwestern Christian Advocate. A special effort was made to get as many of them as possible to meet Dr. King. They came in large numbers, many of them ready to take

the paper. We were successful in getting eighty-three subscribers

with the promise to make it one hundred.

We are here with heartfelt satisfaction that the cause entrusted to our care has not been neglected, and we await your assignment for another year, that we might willingly go forth to our newly appointed post of labor and there wait patiently, and work and watch and pray for the own good time of that gracious and merciful God who wills not the death of the sinner, but his conversion and his life.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON WORLD SERVICE

We, your Committee on World Service, respectfully submit the following report:

Service is sublime. Upon it our Savior, the blessed Christ, affixed his seal of approval, not only by words that gave it a sacred meaning, but by the won-

derfully unselfish service which he gave to the world.

"He that is Chief, as he that doth serve." Transposed, the words, "World Service," would read, "Serving the world." Written into the program of our

great church, it is a fitting definition of what our beloved Methodism is un-

dertaking to do.

Far reaching, and aggressive were our missionary activities, throughout the world prior to the outbreak of the great World War, the conditions affecting the peoples of earth resulting therefrom, made it clear that all prior efforts were entirely inadequate to meet the physical and spiritual needs of a bleeding world.

In the most dreadful calamity that had ever faced the races of mankind,

a suffering world cried pittifully to the church of God, for help.

It was purely natural that these people sorely afflicted would turn to Christian America in general and the Methodist Episcopal Church, in particular, to square their principals of religion, by the example of the "Good Samaritan."

Our church promptly accepted the challenge. The Centenary movement, with its wonderful program, was the outgrowth of this challenge, marshalled its tremendous forces, and went forth to its task.

Great as was the Centenary movement—begun in the Methodist Episcopal Church—imitated by other denominations—the success which attended that mammoth undertaking was not disappointing.

In all of our missionary and humanitarian endeavors in both the home and foreign fields, new but consecrated and efficient recruits were rushed to the front, and placed on the firing line, not in a war having for its objective, "Worldwide" Democracy, but for the rebuilding of the Christ-life, in hearts of men.

The Centenary served well its purpose, and was not disappointing to those of our Zion who were its authors. Although its time was up, its task had but fairly begun.

These unfinished tasks, gave conception and birth to the World Service, which must be vigorously prosecuted or there must be serious curtailment of our world-

wide, soul-saving program.

We notice with joy that there has been increases in World Service offerings on several charges within the bounds of the Conference; we also view with alarm that some others have fallen vastly below what these charges have previously given for this paramount cause. Your Committee begs to offer the following resolutions, which we trust will prevent a re-occurrence of deficiencies on any of the charges:

First: That there shall be adherance to the law of our church requiring that monthly payments be made of all "World Service" money collected.

Second: That there be organized and maintained a regular World Service unit throughout the Conference.

Third: A full and unstinted distribution of World Service literature in all of the churches.

Fourth: That the amount of money to be raised by each charge, should be, wherever possible, equal to the amount fixed for pastor's salary, thus agreeing with the principles taught by the Christ, that we should do as much for others as for ourselves.

We further recommend that each pastor preach a sermon on World Service

once a month in his charge, and faithfully follow up results.

We finally recommend that we all go from the seat of this Conference, and, without delay, get under our World Service assessments, and under God, make the year before us the greatest in the history of this Conference, our slogan being one hundred per cent of our World Service assessments, monthly collected, and immediately remitted to the "World Service" Treasurer, Chicago, Ill.

COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL SERVICE

The ministry of Jesus was a social ministry. In His presence and service at the marriage at Cana of Galilee, in His feeding of the five thousand, in His raising of Lazarus from the grave, and in all other of His activities, Jesus made clear that His was a social ministry.

The history of social progress traces the hand of the Christ along its onward path of development.

Such institutions as Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. Hospitals, and charitable institutions of all sorts, are but the outgrowth of the social ministry of the Christ.

In our late years, Social Service has taken on new aspects.

In the rural sections the school houses and the church buildings have become social centers. In urban sections the church co-operates most happily with such recognized social institutions as are at work for the social elevation of humanity.

The Committee on Social Service recommends that all of our churches indorse what authorized social institutions exist so far as they are in league with the program of the church for general uplift.

The Committee further recommends that as far as practical, our rural churches be opened through the days of the week for social activity and that our ministers support morally and actively such service as may be practicable and beneficial.

The Committee indorses Report No. 25 on the Committee of International Justice and Goodwill, as acted upon by the General Conference, 1924, and that the D. S. make the purpose of the General Conference effective by establishing wherever practicable, committees on International Justice and Goodwill in the Quarterly Conferences within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM

2. That we no longer depend upon sweeping the people into the Kingdom in mass upon waves of enthusiasm, but that we enlist each member of the church as a "Life Saver" who is to go to the rescue and save one man.

3. That we appreciate the fact that the youth of the world affords us our largest opportunity, and that we make the Sunday school and Epworth League the field of our chief endeavor (1) By seeing to it that the teachers and workers of these auxiliaries are saved themselves, (2) and that the lessons shall be taught and programs built not to entertain merely, but to evangelize, so that it may be said of the present church as it was said of the early church, "There was added unto the church daily such as are being saved."
