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

## DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The North Carolina Annual Conference met in its seventy-first session in Saint Paul M. E. Church, Winston-Salem, North Carolina, October 23, 1929, at 2:00 P. M.

Through a letter from Orrin W. Auman, Chicago, Illinois, R. W. Winchester introduced to the Conference Bishop Charles W. Mead, the President of the session. Bishop Mead opened the session with Number 141, Methodist Hymnal, and offered the opening prayer. Following Hymn 325, the Bishop read a scripture lesson from Saint John, 13th Chapter. Following a helpful exposition on the scripture read, he, assisted by the four District Superintendents,—J. P. Morris, N. J. Pass, James A. Baxter, and G. M. Phelps,—administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

The Secretary of the last Annual Conference called the roll, to which the following brethren responded:

In response to QUESTION 17, the Secretary reported A. W. McMaster, J. B. Murphy, and A. D. McDonald deceased. The Conference stood while Bishop Mead invoked the blessings of God upon the bereaved families.

**The Organization:** The Conference organized with G. H. Caldwell elected as Secretary. He named as his assistants N. M. Martin, J. E. Brower, and B. F. Thomas.

P. I. Wells, formerly elected Statistician, named as his assistants W. M. Wells, J. B. Meekin, H. C. Gannaway, and E. I. S. Swan.

The Treasurer, R. W. Winchester, named to assist him, D. L. Thomas, J. C. Rush, Robert McRae, P. J. Cook, A. G. Jenkins, D. H. Kearse, W. R. Zeigler, and N. M. Black.

J. E. Brower was elected reporter to the daily press and the church papers.

The Bar of the Conference was made to include the first seven rows of seats from the chancel.

The printed program was approved as the official program of the Conference, excepting the announcements for the Wednesday morning session.

QUESTION 1 was called. The Conference has a Board of Trustees in requirement of State Laws.

Answering the Question, "What Officers and persons holding Conference Funds are Bonded?" the Conference reported S. A. Peeler and R. W. Winchester bonded to the amount of \$1,000 each.

QUESTION 2 was called, in response to which the Conference answered: "None."

The hour for welcome addresses having arrived, Bishop Mead requested our genial host, W. M. Wells, to preside.

Representing His Honor, Mayor George W. Coan, Jr., of the City of Winston-Salem, Mr. Charles W. Fisher, the Executive Secretary of the Y. M. C. A., delighted the Conference with an address of welcome. Rev. H. D. Denson, pastor of Haynes Institutional C. M. E. Church, delivered a welcome on behalf of the Ministerial Brotherhood of the city. Representing the local Church, Prof. E. S. Melton brought words of welcome. P. I. Wells, pastor of Leaksville M. E. Church, in well chosen words, delivered the address of acceptance on the part of the Conference.

In response to QUESTION 15, J. P. Morris, District Superintendent of the Greensboro District, passed in character and reported the work of his district. The Effective Elders of the Greensboro District were passed in character. N. J. Pass, District Superintendent of the Western District, passed in character and reported the work of the district. The Effective Elders of the Western District were passed in character.

Dr. Conover, of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension, was presented to the Conference. R. W. McAlister, business manager of the Southwestern Christian Advocate, was introduced to the Conference. Dr. S. H. Sweeney, representing the Board of Pensions and Relief, was introduced. He presented a draft from his

Board of \$480, regular appropriation, and \$12.47, interest on Annual Conference investment.

The Conference received the drafts and ordered them turned over to the Treasurer for proper distribution.

A telegram from Bishop H. Lester Smith, the resident Bishop of the Chattanooga Area, was read by Bishop Mead. The telegram provoked a pleasant response from Bishop Mead relative to the effective leadership of Bishop Smith and with regard to the distinction which the North Carolina Conference enjoys in its contribution of Bishop Robert E. Jones to the Episcopacy. The Secretary of the Conference was instructed to convey to Bishops Smith and Jones expressions of its appreciation. (For text of the telegrams, see "Resolutions and Telegrams.")

R. T. Weatherby, Chairman of the Conference Claimants Commission for Permanent Fund, offered a Resolution. The Resolution was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

The various Standing Committees were named by the Cabinet and approved by the Conference. The Chairmen of the various Committees announced the time and place for meeting.

After the usual announcements, the session adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Mead.

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## SECOND DAY

### THURSDAY MORNING SESSION

Devotions conducted by Bishop Mead included Hymn No. 41, prayer, a Scripture lesson taken from Ephesians, the fourth chapter, followed by Hymn No. 33. Bishop Mead delivered the morning devotional address from the passage of scripture read.

The minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

**Statistical Session:** Pursuant to a previous order, the Conference entered into statistical session. The names of the Charges and Pastors were called, in response to which the reports for the respective Charges were passed to the Treasurer and Statistician respectively.

Continuing QUESTION 15, G. M. Phelps, District Superintendent of the Wilmington District, passed in character and reported the work of his District. The Effective Elders of the Wilmington District were passed in character. James A. Baxter, District Superintendent of the Winston District, passed in character and reported his work. The Effective Elders of the Western District were passed in character.

Completing QUESTION 15, R. N. Brooks, Professor at Gammon Theological Seminary; R. G. Morris, Field Worker for the Board of

Home Missions and Church Extensions, were passed in character. They each brought greetings from the fields of their activities.

QUESTION 26 was called. J. J. Blanton, Daniel Brooks, M. J. Bullock, G. W. Byers, H. O. Frederick, J. H. Garrett, J. D. Hairston, C. E. Howard, J. W. Jones, J. R. McNair, A. B. McQueen, Dorsey McRae, G. W. Morehead, Marcus Mundy, W. W. Pope, and L. W. Thomas were continued in the retired relation.

Father Parks, a retired minister of the West Texas Conference, was introduced for a few remarks, by J. P. Morris.

G. H. Caldwell, Secretary of the Conference, very feelingly and eloquently responded to the various testimonies uttered by the fathers of the Conference. At the close of his remarks the Conference recorded its feelings of appreciation for the services of the retired ministers by a rising vote of thanks. While standing, the Conference sang lustily, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds."

The Retired Relation was granted G. W. Brower and J. C. Addie.

A proposed plan for collection and distribution of Conference Claimants Funds was read by Dr. S. H. Sweeney from the Board of Pensions and Relief. By motion of G. H. Caldwell, consideration of the report was made the order of the day Friday morning at 10:00.

**Constitutional Amendments:** A Committee composed of R. N. Brooks, J. C. Rush, and W. T. Lomax was appointed to present the proposed Constitutional Amendments handed down by the General Conference to be voted upon by the Annual Conferences this year.

Dr. Eckard, a representative from the Book Concern, was introduced to the Conference. He presented from the Book Concern drafts as follows: \$872.00 dividend from the Book Concern products, and \$50.00 from the Chartered Fund. These drafts were received, endorsed by the President and Secretary, and turned over to the Treasurer for proper distribution.

**Bennett College for Women:** Dr. David Dallas Jones, President of Bennett College for Women, was presented to the Conference for an address. In his usual eloquent manner he presented the work of his school. At the close of his address the Secretary called the roll of the Conference for additional reports on the Bennett College Self-Denial Offering Fund. (See report.)

A resolution pleading the continuance of our support to Bennett College, including the Self-Denial Offering of \$2,500, was presented by R. G. Morris, and was enthusiastically received by the Conference.

**Allen Home School:** J. P. Morris called attention to the collections for Allen Home to the amount of \$250.00, the assessed quota for this Conference year. He moved the continuance of a collection of \$250.00 per year until the full amount of \$1,000.00 shall have been raised. The Conference, by a vote, expressed its appreciation

for the work of the school and assured the administration of its most hearty support, both moral and financial.

Consideration for the **Men in the Undergraduate Classes** was made the order of the day for 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon, by motion of R. N. Brooks.

R. G. Morris moved a reconsideration of the order of the day placed at 10:00 o'clock Friday morning. The hour for consideration for the proposed plan for raising and distributing Conference Claimants Funds was changed from 10:00 o'clock to 3:00 o'clock Friday afternoon.

**Introductions:** Drs. N. D. Shambourger, of Louisville, Ky.; S. G. Atkins, President of Slater Teacher's College; Revs. R. L. Peters, Christian Church; E. W. Posey, J. W. McKissick, W. M. Perritt, of the Baptist Church; D. L. Coners, H. A. Keaton, E. M. Oliver, of the A. M. E. Zion Church, were introduced to the Conference.

After the usual announcements, Father W. W. Pope pronounced the benediction.

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## SECOND DAY

### THURSDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Devotions, including the singing of Hymn 388 and an invocation by Bishop Mead.

The order of the day, a consideration of the Undergraduate Classes, was begun.

In response to QUESTION 3, no one was readmitted.

Under QUESTION 4, Marion M. Patrick was received and his Elder's orders from the A. M. E. Zion Church were recognized.

Under QUESTION 5, Prince Albert Taylor, James E. Green, Leroy W. Hedrick, Leander Brown, and Elliott Montgomery were admitted on trial and placed in the studies of the first year. James E. Green and Leander Brown were elected to Deacon's orders, to be ordained elsewhere. Elliott Montgomery was elected to Deacon's orders.

Under QUESTION 6, no one was continued on trial in the studies of the second year.

Under QUESTION 6 (c), Beverly E. Staton was admitted into full membership and placed in the studies of the third year. R. F. McCallum, graduated from the course of study, was admitted into full membership, and was elected to Elder's orders. The case of Henry Jones was deferred, pending the action of the Committee on Conference Relations. Charles L. Bynum was discontinued from the course of studies and requested to enter school. Edward M. McLeod and George W. Patterson were graduated from the course of study and elected to Elder's orders.



Under QUESTION 14, J. E. Green, P. A. Taylor, and L. A. Brown were left without appointments to attend school.

Continuing QUESTION 5, Cyrus W. Perry was received on trial and placed in the studies of the first year.

Under QUESTION 25, E. D. Petty was granted the supernumerary relation for the first year, A. M. Robinson for the second year.

Continuing QUESTION 26, Sandy B. Cornelius was granted the retired relation.

In response to QUESTIONS 9, 19, 21, 22, 23, the Conference answered: "None."

Action in the case of G. E. Hogue was deferred for further consideration.

J. E. Brower was appointed Conference representative for the Methodist Review.

A lively discussion ensued relative to the collecting of the one per cent of the minister's cash salary for Conference Claimants Permanent Fund. The discussion resulted in the proposal of several counter plans, none of which were adopted. By motion of R. T. Wetherby, the Conference moved a postponement of the collection pending results of the plan suggested by Doctor Sweeney and adopted in the Conference at a previous session.

Attention was called to a record in the Journal of our last Annual Session proposing the payment of the \$3.00 expense for each of our retired ministers. On motion of R. T. Weatherby, the Conference proceeded to collect \$14.00 necessary to meet the demands of the Conference order. The collection was lifted and the \$14.00 raised.

The Banner of Honor was awarded to the Greensboro District, by Mr. McAlister, for raising the largest amount of subscriptions to the Southwestern Christian Advocate.

Rev. C. C. Benton, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal Church, was introduced to the Conference.

After the announcements, the session was adjourned with the benediction by Rev. C. C. Benton.

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### THIRD DAY

#### FRIDAY MORNING SESSION

In the morning devotions the Conference sang Hymn No. 631 votional address from the subject, "The Authority of Jesus."

The minutes of the previous session were read and approved. from the Methodist Hymnal. Bishop Mead delivered the morning de-

Some question arose with regard to the status of Cyrus W. Perry in the conference. It was found that he had not previously been received on trial.

For E. D. Petty, who had previously been granted the supernumerary relation, a collection of \$25.40 was lifted as an expression of the sympathy and good will of his brethren in the Conference.

G. A. Hogue, previously received on trial and placed in the studies of the first year, presented credentials from the Baptist Church, which were recognized as Deacon's orders.

Henry Jones was admitted into full membership and advanced to the studies of the third year.

A Committee to arrange for Boys' Conference in connection with our next Conference was ordered appointed by R. T. Weatherby.

A Nominating Committee to name members of Committees not required by Cabinet nomination, was authorized by the Conference.

Dr. Fred A. Butler of the Epworth League Department of the Board of Education was introduced to the Conference for an address.

In response to QUESTION 40, Lenoir, Charlotte, and Mount Airy, by R. B. Rhyne, A. G. Jenkins, and W. R. Zeigler respectively, extended invitations to entertain the Annual Conference at its next setting. The Conference by a vote, accepted the invitation to hold its next session at Charlotte, N. C. By motion of S. A. Peeler, the Conference requested the Secretary to convey its appreciation to Lenoir and Mount Airy for their invitation, with a hope that the invitation might be extended subsequently.

QUESTIONS 29 and 30 were called. (See Reports of the Conference Board of Home Missions and Church Extension and the Conference Board of Foreign Missions.)

A resolution complimentary to the Commission on Ministerial Training and relative to a proposed Summer School for Undergraduates within the bounds of the Conference, was presented by R. N. Brooks. The resolution was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

**Introductions:** Rev. A. J. Corde, Rev. J. E. Holt, of the A. M. E. Church; Rev. E. O. Cowan and Rev. H. B. Moss, of the A. M. E. Zion Church; Rev. J. A. Barnwell, of the Presbyterian Church; Rev. Roberts, of Winston-Salem, and Mr. F. M. Fitz, were introduced.

**The Class for Admission Into Full Membership**, composed of Henry Jones, R. F. McCallum, and Beverly E. Staten, answered the prescribed disciplinary questions in fulfillment of the requirements of the Discipline. Bishop Mead delivered the address for admission, after which the hand of fellowship was extended them by the members of the Conference.

After the usual announcements, the Conference adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Mead.

### THIRD DAY

#### FRIDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Devotions were conducted by the Bishop.

The opening business of the session was devoted to the consideration of the Constitutional Amendments, resulting in the following:

In the original amendment for the participation of laymen in the Annual Conference, the votes stood: Yeas, none; Nos, 57.

On the corrected amendment for the participation of laymen in the Annual Conference, the votes stood: Yeas, 78, Nos, none.

On the amendment empowering Central Conferences to elect Bishops for their Areas, the Conference voted: Yeas 78, Nos, none.

The order for the day for consideration of the plan for collecting and distributing Conference Claimants Funds as presented by Dr. S. H. Sweeney, of the Board of Pensions and Relief, was taken up. By unanimous vote, the plan was adopted.

The Sunday nearest the 30th of May was declared Conference Claimants Sunday, by vote of the Conference.

To the Committee on Nominations was referred the nominating of a trustee to fill the expired term of the present incumbent, representing the laity of the Conference on the Trustee Board at Bennett College for Women.

An action of last year requesting the collection of 1% of the pastor's cash salary to begin a permanent fund for Conference Claimants, was suspended for one year, pending results of the plan proposed by the Board of Pensions and Relief.

A matter of repossessing church property at Concord, N. C., was referred to the Board of Conference Trustees for investigation.

After the usual announcements, the benediction was pronounced by Bishop Mead.

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### FOURTH DAY

#### SATURDAY MORNING SESSION

Devotions were conducted by Bishop Mead.

The minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

QUESTION 31 was called. (See the Statistician's Report.)

QUESTION 32 was called. (See the Conference Treasurer's Report.)

A resolution relative to the School of Methods, fostered by the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension, was presented by R. G. Morris. The resolution was adopted. (See Resolutions.)

The report of the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees was read and adopted.

S. A. Peeler, Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, offered a motion that a statement be inserted in the Minutes to the effect that the Board of Trustees have no fund for burial expense for any of the ministers, and that the Conference would assume no expense for burial above his Conference Claimant annuity. The motion was adopted.

The reports of the Statistician and Treasurer were favorably commented upon and adopted.

The Treasurer's report showed a deficit in World Service collections of \$676.00. Considerable discussion arose with regard to methods of meeting the deficit. The Conference finally voted to borrow \$676.00, requesting the three District Superintendents of the Greensboro, Western, and Winston Districts respectively, to underwrite the same. The Wilmington District was requested to assume whatever part of the amount which might be possible.

The Conference requested the Treasurer to send a telegram to Doctor Ward, the Secretary of the World Service Commission, assuring him that there would be no cut in the appropriation request for the North Carolina Conference.

A subsequent motion prevailed to the effect that the \$676.00 be borrowed from the Board of Trustees on good security.

A telegram from Bishop Robert E. Jones was read at the Conference. (See Telegrams.)

On motion of Robert N. Brooks, the Conference recorded its pleasure of the kind thought of Bishop Jones toward his brethren of the North Carolina Conference.

A lively discussion arose growing out of a motion offered by J. P. Morris, that the Conference send a fraternal greeting to the North Carolina Conference of the M. E. Church South, in session at High Point, N. C. By motion of J. W. Simpson the motion as offered by J. P. Morris was laid on the table.

QUESTIONS 34, 35, and 36 were called. For answers to these questions, see Reports of Conference Treasurer and Stewards. The Stewards' Report was adopted.

On motion of personal privilege, A. H. Newsome, W. T. Lomax, and R. B. Rhyne, representing the men of the Western District, pre-

sented to N. J. Pass, the retiring District Superintendent of that District, a fountain pen and a purse as a token of their appreciation for his kindly and efficient service. N. J. Pass, in his usual happy mode, made a fitting response.

The following committees were nominated and approved:

**Allen Home School:**

Reports from the four Districts showed that a total of \$277.50 had been collected and turned over to the Allen Home School. Miss Isabelle R. Jones, special representative of the school, expressed the school's appreciation both for the money collected during the year and for all past support, financial and moral. She further solicited the continued co-operation of the men of the Conference in the work of her school.

J. M. Harris offered a resolution complimentary of the work of Allen Home School. G. H. Caldwell, in a happy manner, spoke to the resolution. The resolution was unanimously adopted. J. P. Morris offered a motion pledging the support of the Conference to the school, and reaffirming the action of a previous session to collect \$250.00 per year until the \$1,000.00 is collected.

**Introductions:** Dr. Arthur R. Howard of the Board of Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morals, was introduced. He made some terse remarks relative to the work of his Board.

Young Master Kears, the son of Rev. D. H. Kears, was presented to the Conference by Bishop Mead. He was requested to sing a Negro Spiritual and make some remarks relative to his preaching and his call to Christian service. The impression made by young Kears was evident.

R. G. Morris offered a resolution memorializing the Board of Bishops to place the time of our Conference to embrace the first Sunday in November. The resolution was adopted.

By motion of H. L. Ashe, a special committee for sending a communication to President Hoover complimentary of the stand he takes on public questions and issues, was ordered appointed. The committee as appointed by the Bishop and adopted by the Conference, is as follows: H. L. Ashe, R. N. Brooks, N. S. Schambourger. The communication to President Hoover, as reported by the special committee, was ordered inserted in the Minutes. (For communication, see Resolutions and Letters.)

**Election of Statistician and Treasurer:** P. I. Wells was elected

Statistician. By motion the Treasurer was elected by ballot. The tellers appointed were S. F. B. Peace and W. T. Lomax. The election resulted in the following ballot: N. J. Pass, 25; J. E. Brower, 27. J. E. Brower was declared elected Treasurer.

By motion of G. H. Caldwell, the Conference ordered the printing of 1,200 Minutes.

By motion of G. H. Caldwell, the printed Journal became the official records of the Seventy-first Session of the North Carolina Conference.

By motion, the Conference ordered that when the afternoon session adjourned it should meet at 4:00 o'clock in the afternoon.

A resolution appreciative of Bishop Mead's fine Presidency and executive efficiency was offered by R. T. Weatherby and J. E. Brower. The resolution also included expressions of appreciation of Bishop H. Lester Smith's service as Bishop of the Area, and pledging to him the heartiest co-operation on the part of the men of the Conference.

Some question arose as to the time of Dr. Howard's address and the reading of appointments. A motion by H. L. Ashe that Dr. Howard's address should immediately precede the reading of the appointments and that the appointments should be read Sunday afternoon, prevailed.

##### SATURDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

At the request of Bishop Mead, H. L. Ashe presided. Devotions were conducted by H. L. Ashe.

Howard, the complimentary resolutions, the final devotions, and the reading of the appointments, the Seventy-first Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference should stand adjourned, sine die.

## VI REPORTS

### (A) DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

#### GREENSBORO DISTRICT

J. P. MORRIS, District Superintendent.

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

We are glad to extend a cordial welcome to Bishop Charles L. Mead, who comes to labor with us in this Conference. We are sure that he will find the brethren ready to make this a pleasant as well as a successful session of our work. Through the mercies of God we are permitted to make this our third report for the Greensboro District.

In the beginning of the conference year we had an automobile accident and it looked as though for a while that some one else would have to make this report. But God saw fit to spare us longer and relief speedily came so that we were on the job in eight weeks from the date of the accident, and by hard work and strenuous effort and by the very fine co-operation of the brethren of the district we on the whole will be able to measure up to last year, and in some things will even surpass our last year's report.

#### WORLD SERVICE

This has been a very close year financially. In some phases of our finance we have fallen short, but great sacrifices have been made both by the pastors and their constituency. At nearly every point the personal and local interest have been sacrificed for the greater demand (World Service). We think on the whole we will have just a few dollars more this year for benevolences on apportionment than we had last year. We have endeavored to push every point that has been suggested to us from Chicago, and the brethren have used every means possible to succeed. Our salaries may come up a little short, also our local indebtedness, but this is not a lack of interest in our local support, but because of a determination to bring up the missionary budget at any cost. We were deprived of attending the District Superintendent's Meeting at Evanston, but we came in possession of the facts and plans and have striven to carry them out, and in some respects have succeeded.

#### MATERIAL GROWTH

Although we have put much of our energy upon our World Service askings, we did not wholly forsake our local interest. At several points in our district something has been added materially. Quite a lot of beautifying by the way of painting and cleaning up the church premises, and covering the church buildings where they were leaking has been accomplished. On the Caswell Charge both of the churches have been made to look almost like new. East Greensboro has finished brick veneering one of her churches and has started to rebuild and veneer the other one. South Greensboro has bought and paid for three acres of valuable land for a parsonage site. Ramseur has paid off the entire indebtedness on a new parsonage. High Street has re-seated the church at a cost of about \$700.00 and has paid the biggest part of the bill. Several other points have done minor forms of beautifying the church and parsonage property, so as to make them tasty and attractive. Pastors and people are rapidly learning that God loves the beautiful both in nature and character.

#### YOUNG PEOPLE'S ORGANIZATION

Our Epworth League and Sunday School Convention were pre-eminently a success. On the program we had more than a dozen of the young ladies who were either graduates or students of Bennett College for Women. These girls showed the excellent training that they had received from this place of culture and refinement. Every

paper was well prepared and the discussions were interesting from beginning to end. Our young people's meetings are growing yearly, the advancement is along all lines. The determination of the youth of the district is to exhibit a constant growth in their work every year. The Sunday Schools are taking on new life because of the information and inspiration gathered from the discussions of how to make these young people's organizations a real success. The president of our district work for the young people, Brother N. C. Clapp, deserves much praise for the way in which he has succeeded in managing the young people of the district.

#### OUR SCHOOLS

The Greensboro District is blessed with educational facilities. Among the schools is our own Bennett College for Women. The outlook for this institution is simply fine. With President D. D. Jones and his congenial wife at the head and the excellent corps of faculty who are graduates of the leading schools of the country both North and South, there can be nothing less than success. The program of the school helps not only the girls of the school but the entire vicinity of housekeepers as well. We take time in our Quarterly Conference to urge young women to attend this school if an education worth while is desired. The growth of the school is phenomenal. We predict that in a few years, at the present rate of growth, there will not be a school for the girls of our group that will surpass it. Allen at Asheville is another fine school manned by the Woman's Home Missionary Society, which deserves our attention. We are proud of these schools and are doing our best to give them adequate support.

#### RETIRED PREACHERS

We wish to commend to this body our retired brethren: M. J. Bullock, G. W. Byers, J. W. Jones, L. W. Thomas, and J. H. Garrett. These brethren are doing all they can to assist the pastors in pushing forward the work of the kingdom. Deceased: A. D. McDonald departed this life January 1, 1929. Brother A. W. McMaster also left us since last Conference. These brethren depleted the ranks below but increased the souls above.

#### EVANGELISM

We believe in a whole-souled Evangelism. We welcome all of the literature that comes to us along this line and are helped much by it in our evangelical work. This world of ours, though old, is doing things in a new way. Evangelism is also as old as Methodism, but in keeping within the times we are seeking the salvation of souls by the most modern methods. Yet we welcome any method that will reach our people and cause them to live better and higher lives.

**WESTERN DISTRICT**

N. J. PASS, District Superintendent.

Dear Bishop, Fathers and Brothers:

Under the guiding hand, the merciful and tender care of the one Father of us all, we have come to the close of another Conference year. We rejoice that God has counted us worthy of the blessings and privileges afforded us, to have labored in His Vineyard, during the year, and having been at no time unmindful of our duties and responsibilities, we are here, by His grace, to give an account of our stewardship.

Reference to the fact that this is my sixth, and last report, until I shall have abided the time fixed by the law of the Church, is needless, for, if like Rip van Winkle, I had fallen asleep, and all records of our Conferences destroyed, there are many whose gentle hands would shake from slumber to consciousness and with the kindest feelings, purest motives, and the best intentions, remind me that my time was up.

In some of my previous reports I have given rather extensive descriptions of the topography, shape, size, sparsely settled and other complex aspects of the Western District, which I deem unnecessary to repeat at this time. It remains, however, true and unchanged, that our Church work is almost entirely rural, and the industries open to our people are wholly agricultural, and the only money crop is cotton, which is by no means a sure crop for the mountainous regions of our district, the economic condition of the farmers is never as prosperous as they are in other parts of the state not similarly affected. Yet, while this has been a hard year on all classes of farmers within the bounds of our district, with serious labor troubles in our manufacturing centers, Gastonia and Marion, adding much to the acuteness of a painful panicky condition, barring all of these, we have had one of our best year's work the Western District has ever experienced. God has been gracious to the pastors and their families, none of whom have been removed by death or incapacitated to any serious extent by sickness for the performance of normal work.

**SUNDAY SCHOOL AND EPWORTH LEAGUE CONVENTION**

Our Sunday School and Epworth League Convention met during the month of May, at Old Fort, N. C., in Bynum's Chapel Church, of which Rev. A. E. Roberson is pastor. It was composed of a fine bunch of the young men and young women of the district, whose brilliant lives are being dedicated through our great Church to the service of God. The conventions will be long remembered for the real good accomplished in that little historic mountain city. All denominations conceded that it was by far the best that had ever been held within their bounds. Great encouragement comes to us from the fact that these auxiliaries of our Church—the Epworth Leagues and the Sunday Schools—are manned, with few exceptions, by the young people,

fresh from the schools of our Church, and evince that exalted and sublime spirit of unselfishness and consecrated leadership which the present day demands.

#### DISTRICT CONFERENCE

Our District Conference was held during the month of July, at Newton, N. C. Rev. Charles Bynum, pastor. This also was an intellectual and spiritual feast. Profound impressions were made, and much good done. Addresses, essays, papers read and sermons preached were of a high order, and went a long way in placing our Church upon the consciousness of a comparatively strange people, as we had not met in that city for a decade or more.

#### EDUCATION

On the crest of the Blue Ridge Mountains, in the well known city of Asheville, N. C., is Allen Home, a standard high school for girls, under the auspices of the Woman's Home Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church. As this school has met all of the rigid requirements of the North Carolina State Board of Education, and has qualified as a standard high school with a teacher training department, its usefulness has been materially increased. It now not only supplies our Methodist and other parsonages with competent and well trained mistresses but teachers of character, culture, and religion, for any part of the world in which their lots might be cast. We pledge to Allen Home the continued support of the Western District and earnestly commend it to like consideration of each of the other districts in this Conference, as well as to all friends of Christian education everywhere.

#### BENNETT COLLEGE FOR WOMEN

The rapid growth and development of Bennett College for Women is exceedingly gratifying to us. When all conditions required by the State Department of Education are met to give to this institution an "A" rating, entitling her graduates to high school "A" certificates to teach in the schools and colleges in this and other states, it will enter upon an era of large usefulness. We heartily endorse the very splendid work being done there by President David D. Jones, his wife, and able faculty, and back into the ranks of the pastorate, out of which District Superintendents come, we shall continue to give it our loyal and enthusiastic support.

#### WORLD SERVICE

Owing to the financial stringency felt throughout the South this year, and as has been already referred to, the lateness of placing cotton on the market, our World Service collections will hardly come up to our expectations, as the goal we set was 100%. From reports coming in, however, we are glad to forecast that we will hold our own in comparison with last year's offerings, if indeed we do not go beyond.



## WORK ON THE DISTRICT

We are glad, dear Bishop, to report that as we have traveled over the district, we see on all sides and from every angle of human uplift in which the Church is directing its activities, many signs of remarkable progress—better homes, purer homes, higher moral ideals, and Christian living. In many of these homes the people are again returning to the once deserted and torn-down family altar to rebuild and worship there the God of their fathers. Many of our people own or are buying their own homes, and it is pleasing indeed to observe that the number is rapidly increasing. The family gathered into these cozy buildings which are theirs in fee simple assume an air of contentment and happiness never before experienced. They become settled in their communities and no longer are nomads or transient. They are valuable assets to the Church of their choice and better citizens of the State and country.

Some of the charges in the district had great revivals during the year, as their reports will show, and many souls were brought into the Kingdom of God and joined our Church. Rejoicing, Bishop, that in the providence of God you have been assigned to hold this session of our Conference, we sincerely thank you for the sacrifice which you must have suffered in the necessity of changing your plans to relieve what would have been a more disastrous situation. We cannot tell you how much the granting of another week longer from the date originally fixed for the opening of this Conference means to the Church in general, in the way of increased World Service offerings, and to our pastors, whose large salary deficits stared distressingly in their faces. While all of the disadvantages of an unusually hard year financially, and an extremely late harvest of the cotton crop, preceded by gales and floods, could not be overcome in one week, yet, sir, this brief respite has been of untold help to every interest of the Conference and its pastors.

Again we thank you, and sincerely hope that your stay among us will be as pleasant to you, sir, as we are sure yours will be profitable and pleasant to us. Permit me, Bishop, to thank my colleagues in the cabinet for their Christian fellowship and brotherly kindness during the years we have worked together—the pastors who have served with me on the Western District, for the united support given me, without which failure would have been inevitable. I must turn my portfolio over to another, who this good Bishop will appoint. Step up, not down, and take my place once more in the active pastorate. For these six years our association has been pleasant, our relations brotherly, our burdens and our joys mutual, our friendship strengthened by these years of comradeship. I must bid you an affectionate adieu. I leave you with malice and hatred toward none, but with peace and love to all. I have done my best to be true to my God, my Church, and to my brethren. If in any of these efforts I

have failed, one little verse of an unknown author comforts and consoles me—

“Before God’s footstool, to confess,  
A poor soul knelt with bowed head.”

“I’ve failed,” he cried. The Master said: “Thou didst thy best,  
and that’s success.”

It is my privilege and pleasure for the fifth time to make an annual report as District Superintendent of the Wilmington District. I am pleased to say that at no time have I been more encouraged over the bright prospect for the Wilmington District than now.

When we were assigned to the district on last November, we came together before leaving the seat of the Conference and agreed to give our attention to the cause of Education within our own Conference, until we could have a district meeting and outline our program for the year. This was done, with amazing results. We have found out that things go better for the district when it is known by each congregation that all are working for the same thing. We have not one of our church schools in the Wilmington District. Nevertheless, we are no less interested in those in other districts located within the bounds of our Conference. Our ambition is to raise as much money and send as many students as any other district.

Soon after returning to our field of labor, last fall, we met in Maxton to outline our program for the year. I am sure you realize with us that it is useless to attempt much without a program. Our program having been carefully outlined, each fellow with one in hand has followed the same throughout the year without a break. The results of this will be seen in the more detailed report of each pastor. One of the things that has given us great concern this year is the quarterly conferences. It was noted that the interest which once followed the quarterly conferences on the part of the laymen had waned considerably, and the changing of this condition certainly rested upon us.

To help turn the tide, we have made a special study of each quarterly conference, each pastor has been asked by the District Superintendent to notify him as to his program leading up through his quarterly conference, so that the talk in the quarterly conference and the sermon on Sunday night be in keeping with the pastor’s program. Of course, this need not interfere with the special message on the different causes of the church, which, by all means, should be prepared with each group in mind.

### THE DISTRICT CONFERENCE

Two or three things entered into our District Conference this year and helped wonderfully in making our district a rare treat. I should mention, first, the welcome and unexpected visitor, Dr. L. H. King. It was in our minds to organize at the Conference to get our quota for the Southwestern Christian Advocate. His presence, together with the information and inspiration which he always brings, meant much toward this desired end. In our District gathering, as pastors and District Superintendent, we faced unflinchingly those problems, or, at least some of them, which are affecting the success of our ministry. After an open and frank discussion on these things, we were also privileged to have Dr. R. N. Brooks close out our session for us.

One of the main things taken up by Dr. Brooks was that of the Supply Pastors. It was to this end, particularly, that he was invited to our district. We have in our district a group of supply pastors who are beyond the average in efficiency and, above all, they are determined to keep in line with the program of the church.

### SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND EPWORTH LEAGUE INSTITUTE

There being no Institute in the Conference to take up this work, for the past two or three years, with the help of Dr. Butler and Dr. Howard, we have been trying to organize one in the Wilmington District. Before taking any steps toward the organization this year, we asked Dr. Butler to lay before us the requirements for such an Institute, that we might arrange our program to carry out the same as near as possible. Dr. Butler was with us from start to finish, giving the necessary advice wherever needed. We are asking, for next year, that the requirements laid before us shall be necessary for enrolment with the other Institutes of the church, and we shall qualify for the same. We are certainly anxious about the success of both the Sunday School and Epworth League. Our observation has been that we are weakest as a whole in keeping in line these two organizations. Therefore the conclusion is that the young people are not being properly cared for.

### THE EVANGELISTIC WORK

This cause has probably given more concern than any other we have had to face. The people with whom we have had to deal, some of which have changed completely in their ideas as to how this work is to be done; while many others still cling to the way that reached them. It is to be understood that both of these groups find their leader among us. We are hoping, therefore, for the day to soon come when we can have an evangelistic worker each year to spend a few weeks or months in our district to do evangelistic work. If this cannot be done, then we hope we can spend a few days each year studying this problem under the supervision of some trained leader.

## WINSTON DISTRICT

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

We are truly grateful to God, our Father, for His redeeming love; who has so wonderfully preserved us in health, and so graciously provided for our sustenance since we parted a year ago for our several and varied fields of labor. For a short space of time we have laid aside our implements of toil and have journeyed here to Jerusalem to give an account of our stewardship. We hope that all have done so well that they will justly receive the "well done" applause.

In our group, however, we have the different talented—the one, the two, the three, and even the five-talented men. Many have doubled their talents; and there are those who have hid their Lord's money. The one that has hidden his talent will not be hard to locate; he is still accusing the church and its retinue of officials as hard task-masters—gathering where they have not sown, collecting salaries where no labor has been bestowed, sending money off to the mission fields when we need it at home. Fearful and doubting the wisdom of the Church, they hid their talent, and the results will be seen in some of their reports. The faultfinding started in the pulpit and kept on down to the door. Those who have gained other talents accepted the task to start with as hard, but with faith they went forth to their task. Hoping for the best, they applied themselves with much zeal; their faith begot faith, their hope begot hope, their zeal begot zeal, and today they come forth bearing the precious sheaves.

Some of our most faithful pastors have been impeded in their progress by sickness and even death in their homes. They are here with a feeling similar to that of the great apostle to the Gentiles: "We have been troubled on every side yet not distressed, perplexed but not in despair, persecuted but not forsaken, cast down but not destroyed"—always bearing about in the body the dying of our Lord Jesus, that the life also of Jesus might be made manifest in our body. As awful as has been the ordeal, and severe the affliction, when compared with what there is in store for the faithful there is no expression in their bearing that declares that "our light affliction which is but for a moment worketh for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory."

The reading of this report closes my fifth year of sojourn among the brethren of the Winston District, helping in every way possible to make their work count a hundred per cent. I find in several places the idea of merging needs to be encouraged and is being encouraged. However, the process is quite slow, due largely to the fact that many of the good old saints are feline in their nature. They become attached to the place and not to persons. The little brown church in the vale surrounded by a well-filled graveyard, with a congregation like a potato-patch (the best part under ground). The remaining few mothers and fathers left in Zion, rather than transfer their membership a few miles farther into a more prosperous community where

the prospects for better church life is propitious, would choose to stay near where all the kinfolks are buried and make the superintendent see stars at noontide for not sending them a pastor of first rate ability who must pay his own way there and back home; and when the pastor refuses to defray his own expenses, then he is charged with deserting his call to the ministry.

There is also a general complaint that they, as a charge, are over-rated when it comes to their financial obligations. We are charged with a membership that does not exist. The names on the church records do not tally with the actual count; and if the count was made there would be found less members than the records show. With a smaller membership there would be less obligations. In many instances, the complaint is plausible and worthy of consideration. In such cases they were shown that the pruning-hook was in their own hands and could begin to remedy their case as soon as they saw fit, by seeing to it that the committee on church records functions. Often there has been a disposition to do some pruning, but there is an outcry from the pastor: "Don't do any pruning now but wait, father, for a later day; wait until I am gone before you do any cutting." So it goes on indefinitely—each pastor willing, perfectly willing, for the pruning, "but let it come in the administration of my successor."

#### EDUCATION

We have not failed to foster every cause pertaining to the educational interests—Allen Home and Bennett College for Women. Through the efforts put forth at our District Conference, one-fourth of our allotment was paid. We are expecting every man to pay up his deficiency for Bennett College here at the seat of the Conference. These schools are meeting the crying needs of our people far beyond our expectations, and to fail them in their urgent requests would be disloyalty. We hear no blare of trumpets or beating of drums in the advertisements of these schools, but the quiet shining forth of the students' life in the communities in which they live is making sentiment with such telling effect that at Bennett College the number of students in college department exceeds that of all the departments combined in the previous years. This could not have been true unless Bennett College was meeting a need long since felt by our women.

#### BENEVOLENCES

We have read with much interest the extracts from the recent meeting of men gleaming facts from the field of Missions, from whom have come pointers as to the outcome of missionary year that will come to a close shortly after the adjournment of this, our Conference session. The pleas that come from Bishops McConnell, McDowell, Richardson, Birney in China, Johnson in Africa, Robinson in India, Wade in Europe, Baker in Japan, are heartrending, as they seem to sense a twenty-five per cent cut in appropriations due to the apparent falling tide in benevolent giving. I feel some of the same

quaking in me as many of the formerly faithful pastors are reporting less than last year's benevolences. Yet I am hopeful and optimistic enough to believe that if our district does not make a gain it will at least hold even with last year, thereby suffering no loss.

Bishop, we are earnestly praying that the speed-crazed age will not bewilder the church so as to cause her to lose her bearing, and forget her mission to a sin-smitten world. Yet there are times when she needs to drive like Jehu; but instead she seems to be running a close second to Balaam going down to Jericho. At times she forgets that the King's business demands haste. "Don't stop to salute anyone by the way," is the command. She seems to hear the prophet calling. Stand still and see the salvation of God.

"To all things there is a time and season," says the preacher; and if there was ever a time for the Church to be on the alert it is now. The perilous times demand it. The advice of Babcock is very timely:

### BE STRONG!

We are not here to play, to dream, to drift;  
We have hard work to do, and loads to lift.  
Shun not the struggle, face it; 'tis God's gift—  
Be strong, be strong.

Be strong!  
It matters not how deep entrenched the wrong,  
How hard the battle goes, the day, how long;  
Faint not, fight on! Tomorrow comes the song—  
Be Strong, Be Strong!

(A) BENNETT COLLEGE FOR WOMEN

Resolved, that in the light of the splendid substantial growth that has been shown by Bennett College for Women; that in the light of the financial support which has come from decided sources, that we continue in a larger measure to support the school through our prayers, through our moral influence, through sending students from our community, and through giving our people opportunity to contribute to self-denial.

Resolved, that the goal for self-denial should be \$2,500.00, as in former years.

(B) SCHOOL OF METHODS

The rural and village problem constitutes one of the major tasks of our American life. Thirty-two million of our American people live in rural territory and 11,000,000 of these are untouched by the Church. The Board of Home Missions and Church Extension feels that it is one of its great opportunities—its major task—to administer to our rural population. Therefore, for a number of years the Board has maintained and operated a School of Methods in various centers to help the ministers to a more proper appreciation of their tasks. For a number of years these schools were maintained solely for the ministers of our own communion, but now the policy is interdenominational. One of these schools was operated last year at Livingstone College, with two other denominations co-operating.

In the light of these facts we are asking the Annual Conference to adopt the following resolutions:

1. That we record our appreciation for the work already done, and request the Board to continue its operation of this work in other states.

2. That we set aside the last ten days in July as the time for this summer school. During this period we request the District Superin-

tendents and pastors to pre-empt this period, deferring District Conferences and revival meetings.

3. That we pledge ourselves to enroll at least fifty men in the interdenominational school.

4. That we invite the supply preachers into this fellowship of study.

### (C) PENSIONS AND RELIEF

At the North Carolina Annual Conference was introduced and outlined a plan for work in all the colored conferences as follows:

1. The Board of Pensions and Relief will select two field representatives, for work in the colored conferences.

2. The Board will finance the salary and expenses of these representatives, this to be the financial plan for the present.

3. All collections for conference claimants taken during the interim of Annual Conferences, whether by the pastor or board representatives, shall be sent at once to the offices of the board at Chicago, voucher for same to be given the pastor for use at conference.

4. All collections from the churches for conference claimants brought to the Annual Conference shall be carefully checked and receipted for at the opening of the Annual Conference, on forms supplied by the board. Beginning with the next session of the Annual Conference, the distribution to conference claimants will be made quarterly in advance. The first quarter will be paid claimants by the Conference Stewards in checks. The amount for the remaining three-quarters will be sent immediately by the board representatives to the Board of Pensions and Relief, which will pay the same in quarterly installments in advance to the claimants.

5. Field representatives are to have the full support of the District Superintendents and pastors in the supreme task of increasing current collections for annual distribution.

On motion of A. H. Newsome, the above plan was approved and adopted by the Conference.

Sunday nearest May 30 adopted as Conference Claimants' Day, by motion of Mr. Newsome.

### (D) COMMISSION ON COURSES OF STUDY

The Commission on Courses of Study has clearly recognized that the Conference Course can never take the place of the Theological School. It has constantly urged fuller training for the students and has pointed out to the Boards of Ministerial Training that one of their prime duties is to advise with those looking to the ministry, as well as to those who have already come into its fellowship, as to their education in college and seminary. Further, the high standards set



by the Commission have introduced young men to the educational ideal and have often been the means of stimulating them with the desire for college and seminary training.

The importance of summer schools for ministerial training cannot be overestimated. It is not easy for the student to prepare for his work in some remote field far from libraries and the stimulus of contact with fellow students and teachers. Through our schools, the student listens to the ablest whom the church can provide. He shares his experience with other students and is greatly enriched by helpful contacts. He shares the fellowship of teachers who have faced similar difficulties and are always anxious to shed genial rays of light on their problems. Already a large number of our undergraduates have been attending our summer schools and it is our hope that in the near future there may be practically 100% attendance. In the light of this, we are asking the Annual Conference to concur in the following resolutions:

1. That we establish in the confines of the North Carolina Conference territory a summer school for Ministerial Training; that we make it the place of mid-year examinations, and require of undergraduates attendance upon its sessions. (See Dis., Par. 187, Sec. 5.)

2. That the time of the school be fixed by the executive officers of the Conference Board of Managers for Summer Schools.

3. That we invite into this fellowship of study all supplies who answer to the description of the Discipline, Par. 187, Sec. 7).

4. That we importunately urge the effective elders of the Conference to show a keen interest in the graduate courses.

Resolved, that we earnestly thank his honor, the Honorable Geo. W. Coon, Jr., Mayor of the City of Winston-Salem, for the welcome extended this body through Mr. Fisher, Secretary of the local Y. M. C. A., his able, fluent and scholarly representative, who in such pleasing language extended to us the welcome of the city.

Resolved, that we thank Dr. Densing, pastor of the C. M. E. Church, for the welcome extended in behalf of the Ministerial Alliance of the city; Mr. W. C. Woodland for similar courtesies in behalf of the local church whose guests we are.

Resolved, that we thank Rev. Wm. Wells, officers, members, participating friends, Rev. Dr. P. J. Cook and congregation, Rev. J. W. Simpson, his members, and all others who have so liberally and abundantly supplied daily rations to feed the Conference, its delegates and visitors.

McAlister, of the Southwestern Christian Advocate, Dr. S. H. Sweeny, representing the Board of Pensions and Relief, and the Conference Claimants' Fund; Dr. C. C. Facts from the first ninety sessions are gleaned from the General Minutes and from the Conference Journal for those years, which is now in custody of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

At this date the Conference had 19495 white members and 3990 colored. Without consulting the wisdom of the latter, nearly the whole membership became part of a new church, organized in May, 1845, and called the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Some entered the A. M. E. Church, some of the colored M. E. Church of America; but thousands turned gladly to the bosom of the old Methodist Episcopal Church, as it returned to the State.

At this session a new Conference—the Blue Ridge—was formed, with twelve preachers, 2839 members and probationers, and 41 church edifices.
