DAILY PROCEEDINGS

THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE met in its seventy-second annual session in Simpson Chapel M. E. Church, Charlotte, North Carolina, Thursday morning, November 5, 1930, at 9:00 o'clock.

Bishop Robert E. Jones, resident Bishop of the New Orleans Area, and an honored member of the North Carolina Conference, called the session to order.

IN THE DEVOTIONAL PERIOD the Conference, led by the Church Choir, sang from the Methodist Hymnal, No. 577, "O God, Our Help in Ages Past." The Twenty-third Psalm was read responsively. Hymn No. 147, "'Tis Midnight and on Olive's Brow," was sung, after which Bishop Jones delivered the devotional address of the morning. His address, based on "Spiritual Aspects of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper," was a gem of masterful thinking and spiritual power.

THE SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER was administered by the Bishop, assisted by the four District Superintendents.

ROLL CALL: The Secretary of the last Conference was requested to call the roll.

At the calling of the names of the deceased brethren—G. W. Brower, C. E. Howard, J. W. Jones, A. G. Jenkins, N. M. Martin, E. D. Petty, Robert Smith, and Elliot Montgomery—the Conference stood while Bishop Jones invoked the blessings of God upon the bereaved families of the deceased.

ORGANIZATION: The Conference organized with G. H. Galdwell elected Secretary. He chose as his assistants W. S. Scarborough, W. T. Lomax, and R. S. Abernethy.

P. I. Wells, previously elected Statistician, named as his assistants W. M. Wells, H. C. Gannaway, J. B. Meekins, and E. I. Swann.

J. E. Brower, the elected Treasurer from our last session, named to assist him D. L. Thomas, Leroy Hedrick, J. C. Rush, D. H. Kearse, Robert McRae, W. R. Zeigler, P. J. Cook, and N. M. Black.

THE BAR OF THE CONFERENCE was made to include the first seven seats from the Chancel.

THE HOUR FOR OPENING the morning session was fixed at 9:00, with adjournment subject to the pleasure of the Conference.

FOR REPORTER to the Church papers and the daily press, D. L. Thomas was elected.

THE CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE, Southwestern Edition, was ably represented by Mr. R. H. McAlister, Business Manager for the paper.

IN RESPONSE TO QUESTION 15, J. P. Morris, R. W. Winchester, G. M. Phelps, and James A. Baxter, District Superintendents of the Greensboro, Western, Laurinburg, and Winston Districts respectively, were passed in character.

BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS: Dr. A. L. Gray, representing the Board of Foreign Missions, was introduced to the Conference. He is a returned Missionary from India and gave a splendid account of his work while Missionary there.

BOOK CONCERN: Mr. R. H. McAlister of the Southwestern Christian Advocate, brought greetings to the Conference, and repre-

sented Mr. John Venn, of the Book Concern, who was sick in a Charlotte Hospital. He presented from the Book Concern a draft for \$999.08 and a draft from the Chartered Fund of \$60.00. These drafts were received for proper endorsement and ordered turned over to the Conference Treasurer for proper distribution through the Board of Stewards.

AN EXPRESSION OF SYMPATHY in the form of flowers was ordered sent Mr. Venn by motion of R. G. Morris. R. G. Morris was appointed the Chairman of a Committee to convey the expressions of the Conference.

BENNETT COLLEGE FOR WOMEN: President David D. Jones, of Bennett College for Women, was introduced to the Conference. Mr. Jones, with much emphasis and effect, placed on the hearts of the Conference the interest of our school.

Following his address, Dr. H. A. Hawith of the Board of Education, was introduced. He, in fluent, fervent and forceful speech, offered the conditional proposition made by the Rosenwald Fund of a gift of \$250,000 conditioned on the raising of a like sum.

A Resolution drawn by a Special Committee proposing the raising of \$25,000, the campaign to begin following Easter, 1931, the full details of plan to be worked out by a special Committee of Ministers and Laymen, the District Superintendents and the President of the College being requested to serve on the Committee, was unanimously adopted by the Conference. The resolution follows:

"Resolved, First, That the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church pledge herself to raise, within a period of three years, \$25,000 for the special endowment fund for Bennett College for Women;

Second, That the campaign be begun for these funds following Easter, 1931;

Third, That the details of the method of securing pledges and collection of same be left in the hands of a Committee of Ministers and Laymen, assisted by a representative from the Board of Education;

Fourth, That the District Superintendents and the President of Bennett College for Women be requested to serve on this Committee."

"Resolved, That the North Carolina Conference request the Central Committee of the Board of Education and A. L. Hawith as Director of the General Movement, to co-operate with us in every possible way in raising the \$25,000 allocated to the North Carolina Conference."

Continuing the order of the day, the Secretary of the Conference called the Conference roll for delinquent Self-Denial reports to the Bennett College Improvement Fund. The full report of moneys contributed is given under "Statistical Reports." See report.

After the announcements, the morning session adjourned with the benediction by Dr. A. L. Gray.

FIRST DAY, THURSDAY — Afternoon Session.

Bishop Jones called the Conference to order at 2:15 P. M. In the devotions Hymn No. 2 was sung, and J. W. Simpson led in prayer.

QUESTION 26: "Who are the Retired Ministers?" was called. J. C. Addie, J. J. Blanton, Daniel Brooks, M. J. Bullock, G. W. Byers, S. B. Cornelius, H. O. Frederick, J. H. Garrett, J. D. Hairston, J. E. McNair, A. B. McQueen, Dorsey McRae, G. W. Morehead, Marcus Mundy, W. W. Pope, and L. W. Thomas were passed in character and was continued in the supernumerary relation for the third year.

QUESTION 25 was called. A. M. Robertson passed in character tune in the election of Bishop Jones to the Episcopacy, and upon its

QUESTION 1: In response to Question 1, the Conference reported that it has a Board of Trustees in requirement of State Law.

S. A. Peeler, Treasurer of the Conference Trustees, and J. E. Brower, Treasurer of the Conference Funds, were reported bonded to the amount of \$1,000 each.

TO QUESTION 3: "Who have been readmitted?" the Conference answered, None.

G. M. Phelps, James A. Baxter, J. P. Morris and R. W. Winchester reported the work of the Laurinburg, Winston, Greensboro, and Western Districts respectively.

THE EFFECTIVE ELDERS of the four Districts were passed in character, and in response to the calling of the Charges, reported the number of conversions, number of accessions, World Service quota and collections, Conference Claimants quota and collections, and Episcopal Fund collections.

On account of the sickness of his wife, G. W. Morehead was excused from further attendance upon the sessions of the Conference.

BISHOP F. T. KEENEY, resident Bishop of the Atlanta Area, was introduced to the Conference. Bishop Keeney brought a forceful address on the "Work of Evangelism."

Following the announcements, the benediction was had by Bishop Keeney.

FIRST DAY, THURSDAY—Evening Session.

Anniversaries of the Board of Foreign Missions with an address by Dr. A. L. Gray, and the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension with an address by Dr. R. G. Morris, were had at the evening session.

**SECOND DAY, FRIDAY—Morning Session.**

Bishop Jones opened the service with a song led by D. L. Thomas, a prayer by H. L. Ashe, and Hymn No. 2 in the Hymnal, "Come Thou Almighty King."

THE JOURNAL of Thursday morning and afternoon sessions was read by the Secretary, and, with corrections, was adopted.

Expressions of sympathy were sent F. D. Caldwell, a member of the Conference, detained at home because of sickness, by motion of J. E. Hairston. The Secretary was requested to convey the expression of sympathy to Brother Caldwell, and express our regrets that he is unavoidably detained at home because of sickness.

A telegram from Doctor Allen McRossie, Secretary of the Commission on Conference Courses of Study, bringing greetings to Bishop Jones, the Board of Ministerial Training, the Undergraduate classes and the members of the Conference generally, was read by the Secretary.

SUMMER SCHOOLS FOR RURAL PASTORS: R. N. Brooks, Chairman of the Board of Ministerial Training, presented a resolution affecting Summer Schools for Rural Pastors. The resolution was adopted. See resolution.

SUMMER SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY: A resolution purporting to arrange a Summer School of Theology within the confines of the North Carolina Conference was presented by R. N. Brooks, and adopted. See resolution.

By request of the Chairman of the Board of Ministerial Training, the number on the Board was ordered increased from eleven to fifteen. For members of the Board of Ministerial Training, see Boards and Committees.

A collection was lifted to defray some items of local expense connected with fuel and janitor hire at Simpson Chapel Church, the Church in which the Conference was held.

UNDER QUESTION 6: "Who have been continued on trial?" George E. Hogue, passed in character, was advanced to the studies of the second year. Leander A. Brown, James E. Green, Leroy W. Hedrick, Prince Albert Taylor, and Cyrus W. Perry were passed in character and advanced to the studies of the third year. Henry Jones

and Beverly E. Staton were passed in character and advanced to the studies of the fourth year.

UNDER QUESTION 10: "What members are in studies of the fourth year?" the names of Henry Jones and Beverly E. Staton were inserted.

UNDER QUESTION 5: "Who have been received on trial?" Charles G. Bynum was received on trial and placed in the studies of the first year.

THE COMMITTEE ON CONFERENCE RELATIONS presented the names of D. A. Hill for reception on trial, and F. S. Abernathy and J. H. Foy for recognition of orders. In each case action was deferred for further consideration.

IN RESPONSE TO QUESTIONS 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, the Conference answered, None.

IN RESPONSE TO QUESTION 39: "Where shall the next Conference be held?" Leaksville, Lenoir, High Point, and Reidsville extended invitations. By majority vote the invitation from High Point was accepted. The Conference immediately expressed its thanks to the other Churches extending invitations, requesting the Pastors of each to convey their appreciation to the officers of the Churches involved, and made the acceptance of St. Mark Church at High Point unanimous.

Bishop Jones announced Hymns No. 409 and 411, both of which the Conference sang lustily.

INTRODUCTIONS: Rev. John Brower, Rev. J. Wesley Manning, and Rev. George Washington, all of the East Tennessee Conference, were introduced .

UNDER QUESTION 2: "Who have been received by transfer, and from what Conferences?" Rev. John Wells was announced transferred from the Central Alabama Conference.

BISHOP GEORGE C. CLEMENT, D.D., LL.D., one of the distinguished Bishops of the A. M. E. Z. Church, was introduced. Bishop Clement delivered an address bringing greetings from his great Church and felicitating the North Carolina Conference upon its fortune in the election of Bishop Jones to the Episcopacy, and upon its opportunity to help righten some of the mooted problems of our age.

Following Hymn No. 410 from the Methodist Hymnal, DR. H. L. McCrory, President of Johnson C. Smith University, Charlotte, was introduced to the Conference. He was referred to by Bishop Clement as among the most distinguished of Charlotte's citizens. Doctor McCrory's address was heartily received.

A motion prevailed that when the morning session adjourned it should adjourn to meet at 2:45 in the afternoon.

IN THE MORNING ADDRESS Bishop Jones read a scripture from Ephesians, 6th Chapter. He delivered an address which moved the Conference to determined resolve to serve our Master, Jesus Christ, with more determined effort than ever before.

Following the announcements, Bishop George C. Clement pronounced the benediction.

SECOND DAY, FRIDAY—Afternoon Session.

Bishop Jones opened the session with songs Nos. 101 and 423. A. H. Newsome led in prayer. The devotional period closed with Hymn No. 99.

At this point in the session Bishop Jones requested Bishop George C. Clement, of the A. M. E. Z. Church, to preside.

The Secretary of the Conference expressed his appreciation for the kindly co-operation the men of the Conference give him in their prompt response to request that all matter for the Minutes be passed in immediately following action by the Conference. He also expressed a satisfaction at the method used in collections for the Minute Fund. Request was made that the four District Superintendents report their collections to the Secretary at some time during the session of the Conference.

By motion of S. A. Peeler, the four District Superintendents and the Secretary were made the Publishing Committee.

By motion of S. A. Peeler, the Conference ordered the publishing of 1200 Minutes. These are to be distributed to the Pastors, through the District Superintendents, the District Superintendents being held responsible for the number of Minutes distributed by them throughout their Districts.

MOCKSVILLE AND CONCORD PROPERTY: A matter affecting our Church property at Mocksville and Concord, presented by James A. Baxter, was referred to the Board of Trustees.

A RESOLUTION FROM FACULTY AND STUDENTS OF BENNETT COLLEGE FOR WOMEN was read by the Secretary. The Resolution expressed an appreciation for the rich physical and spiritual heritage the new school came into, and assured the Conference and the Alumni of its determination to "carry on." The Resolution was adopted. See Resolution.

President Jones, in presenting the revised, complete Self-Denial collection, expressed the appreciation of the school for the offerings as collected through the various Charges and contributed for use of the College.

The Bennett College Quartette rendered several selections, to the delight of the Conferences.

REPRESENTING THE BOARD OF PENSIONS AND RELIEF, Dr. Charles R. Oaten was introduced. Dr. Oaten pronounced an approved dividend from his Board for the year of \$484, and an interest on permanent investments to the amount of \$12.12, making a total of \$496.12 to be distributed to the Conference Claimants on the quarterly basis.

A Resolution complimentary to Bishop George C. Clement was offered by R. W. Winchester. The Resolution was adopted. See Resolution.

Bishop Clement expressed a pleasure at being present and bade the Conference a fond farewell.

Hymn No. 443 was sung.

IN THE SERIES ON EVANGELISM, Bishop F. T. Keeney delivered his second address in the series from the subject, "The Vanishing Sinner."

The session adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Keeney.

SECOND DAY, FRIDAY — Evening Session.

The Anniversary of the Board of Education was the order, with W. M. Wells presiding.

The Musical Club from Bennett College for Women rendered a program of song and recitation. President Jones delivered the address of the evening. The entire program was of high college rank.

Following the collection and announcements the benediction was had by J. P. Morris.

THIRD DAY, SATURDAY — Morning Session.

Bishop Jones conducted devotions by using Hymns Nos. 5, 43, 741, 82, 84. A Scripture from the Psalter was read, and M. J. Bullock led in prayer.

The minutes of Friday morning and afternoon sessions were read and adopted.

A letter from Mr. John Venn, of the Book Concern, expressing his appreciation for the kindness shown him while in the Charlotte Hospital by the brethren of the Conference, was read by the Secretary.

Mr. McAlister called attention to accounts at the Depositories of the Book Concern at New York, Chicago, and Cincinnati. He requested the brethren of the North Carolina Conference to maintain

their former record of being good buyers of good books and of taking care of the accounts with the Book Concern.

Dr. Charles R. Oaten spoke relative to work of the Board of Pensions and Relief.

A lively discussion ensued relative to the Conference Claimants plan adopted at our last session of the Conference, resulting in leaving the entire matter as it formerly stood.

ANNUITY OF A SUPERNUMERARY PREACHER: A discussion arose relative to the present status of the claims of the widow of the late E. D. Petty. Bishop Jones ruled that the widow of a man dying in the Supernumerary relation was entitled to such claims as his years of active service in the ministry would warrant. With regard to the number of years E. D. Petty had served in the active ranks, a settlement was made by a motion that the number of years be referred to the Board of Stewards for settlement.

Rising to a question of personal privilege, G. M. Phelps presented a box of flowers from the faculty and students of Johnson C. Smith University to Bishop Robert E. Jones. Bishop Jones in kindly and grateful words accepted the flowers.

A Resolution with regard to the School of Methods, presented by R. G. Morris, was adopted by the Conference. See Resolution.

Prior to the Devotional Address of the morning, the Conference sang No. 409. Bishop F. T. Keeney delivered his final address in his series on Evangelism, using as his subject, "The Sin of Indifference." Following the address, Hymn No. 446 was sung.

Dr. Arthur R. Howard of the Board of Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morals, was introduced. He made remarks relative to the work of his Board.

Bishop Jones appointed R. S. Abernathy, Marshall McCollum, R. T. Weatherby and N. J. Pass as additional members of the Board for Ministerial Training. The appointment was confirmed.

The Permanent Committee on the Bennett College Endowment Campaign, known as the Follow-Up Committee, was named as follows: R. T. Weatherby, R. G. Morris, G. H. Caldwell, W. B. Windsor, J. A. McCray and the four District Superintendents. The Committee was confirmed.

In conformity with State requirement, the Conference trustees were elected. By order of the Conference, the Secretary cast its ballot for R. W. Winchester, H. L. Ashe, W. B. Scales, G. M. Phelps, P. J. Cook, S. F. B. Peace, J. E. Brower, M. J. Bullock and S. A. Peeler, as Trustees for the Conference. The Secretary announced the ballot cast and they were declared elected.

As Statistician for the ensuing year, P. I. Wells was elected.

As Treasurer for the ensuing year, J. E. Brower was elected.

QUESTION 31: "What is the Statistician's Report?" was called. The Statistician's Report was approved. See Report.

Dr. M. S. Davage, President of Clark University, was introduced. His address was received with hearty applause.

ALLEN HOME SCHOOL: A communication from Miss L. A. Bell, Superintendent of Allen Home School, was read by the Secretary. The Secretary was asked to convey to Miss Bell expressions of appreciation for the work of Allen Home School through the years.

Miss Isabell R. Jones, President of the Conference Woman's Home Missionary Society, and representative of Allen Home, was introduced.

Mrs. S. A. Peeler, Corresponding Secretary of the Conference Woman's Home Missionary Society, was also introduced. Both Miss Jones and Mrs. Peeler brought greetings from the Society which they represented and requested a full attendance of the members of the Conference at their Anniversary Program in the afternoon. Miss Jones expressed the appreciation of Allen Home School for the support given the school in former years, and requested that we continue our support, especially in the interest of the Daniel Brooks Memorial Library Fund, begun by the Conference.

THE HARSHAW PROPERTY AT MOXVILLE: A question of Law arose relative to distribution of funds accruing from the Harshaw property at Moxville. Bishop Jones ruled that any such fund must be kept in trust for such use as had been designated by the donor. In accordance with this ruling, the Conference ordered that a \$50 check, together with any other funds accruing from the property should be held in trust by the Trustees as custodians of the fund.

The meeting of the Woman's Home Missionary Society was announced for 2:00 in the afternoon.

A motion prevailed that when we adjourn we should meet at 3:00 P. M.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: The Conference ordered an immediate executive session. The pastor appointed to St. Paul Church at Winston-Salem was made the custodian of Conference Claimants funds granted to W. W. Pope. A Resolution was presented by R. W. Winchester, instructing the Conference Board of Trustees to look into the financial needs of the Charlotte Mission, and, if possible, save the property to the Methodist Episcopal Church. The Resolution was adopted.

A collection amounting to \$21.00 was lifted to take care of the Conference expense of the Retired Ministers attending the Confer-

ence. The method of taking care of this expense in the future was left, by motion of the Conference, with the pastor of the Church entertaining the Conference.

The benediction was pronounced by Bishop Jones.

THIRD DAY, SATURDAY — Afternoon Session.

At the close of the Woman's Home Missionary Society meeting, Bishop Jones opened the afternoon session by announcing Hymn No. 300.

The Minutes of the morning session were adopted.

Conference Boards and Commissions as nominated by the Cabinet, were read by the Secretary of the Cabinet, and confirmed by the Conference.

THE ELISHA HOWARD PROPERTY: A Resolution allowing the Trustees to sell the Elisha Howard property, located at Asheboro, was offered by R. W. Winchester and adopted by the Conference. See resolution.

IN RESPONSE TO QUESTION 4, Franklin S. Abernathy was received as Elder on credentials from the A. M. E. Church. John H. Foye was received as Elder on credentials from the A. M. E. Church, and placed in the studies of the third year. S. H. Pressley was received as Elder on credentials from the Baptist Church and was placed in studies of the third year.

CONTINUING QUESTION 5, D. A. Hill, in an earlier session, referred back to the Committee on Conference Relations, was received on trial and placed in the studies of the first year.

UNDER QUESTION 12, John Luther Alford, John W. Fairley, and James Henry Ledwell were elected to local Deacon's Orders.

IN RESPONSE TO QUESTION 13, no one was elected to Elders Orders.

IN RESPONSE TO QUESTION 24, no other personal notations were made.

QUESTION 34: "What are the claims on the Conference Funds?" was called. The Board of Stewards reported receipts and disbursements as indicated in their report. Their report showed an annuity of 940 years at the rate of \$11.00 per year, aggregating \$10,340.00, less \$1,562.00 for deductable income, making an annuity claim of \$8,778.00. They reported for Necessitous Distribution \$450.00, making a total claim of \$9,228.00. For full details, see their report.

The Conference requested the Stewards to distribute the checks

to the Conference Claimants, making a note of the persons through whom the checks were sent, and passing the notation to the Secretary for publication.

The Board of Trustees presented their report. The report was adopted. See report.

The Publishing Committee made its report. The report was adopted. See Trustees' Report.

By motion of H. L. Ashe, the Conference authorized the District Superintendents to pay into the funds of the Conference Trustees, interest on borrowed money at the annual session at Winston-Salem in 1929 out of the first fund coming in from the Easter World Service collections.

On a question of personal privilege, G. M. Phelps presented a box containing the tithe of A. G. Jenkins deceased, with the request of his widow that the funds go to the World Service credit of the Charlotte Church.

Bishop Jones addressed the Conference on the work at the Waveland Assembly Grounds. A contribution of \$75.00 was raised to assist Bishop Jones in the Waveland project.

The printed journal became the official record of the Seventy-second Session of the Conference, by motion of G. H. Caldwell.

On a question of personal privilege, J. C. Rush, on the part of the men of the Laurinburg District, presented to G. M. Phelps, their retiring District Superintendent, a purse. Rev. Phelps made a happy response, assuring the men of his gratitude.

Bishop Jones spoke of the Gammon Lectureship Course and urged those having made subscriptions to pay their pledges.

Rev. G. A. Thomas, of the South Carolina Conference, was introduced.

After announcements, the session adjourned with the benediction by Rev. G. A. Thomas.

A—DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

GREENSBORO DISTRICT

J. P. MORRIS, District Superintendent.

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

We are made happy again by the presence of Bishop R. E. Jones, who comes to preside over us during this Conference session. The North Carolina Conference is proud of him and we are always ready to co-operate with him in making our sessions pleasant. Because of the goodness and mercy of our Heavenly Father, we are permitted to make this, our fourth report, of the work of the Greensboro District. This has been the most strenuous year financially that we have ever witnessed. Early in the Conference year there came a depression over the entire country which, of course, reached our district. But we rallied early in the year and pledged ourselves to carry over the program of the Church at a sacrifice. In our first Quarterly Conferences we laid our plans for the entire year, which, should we have been able to carry them out, would have landed us triumphantly on this end of the year.

World Service

Not only has there been a financial slump over the entire country, but the Greensboro District, in addition, has been the victim of an extended drought which seriously affected the entire farming section. Our district, being largely rural, and our constituency depending almost entirely upon their farms, the churches were helpless and could not meet all of their obligations promptly, and many of them that have never failed before could not meet their obligations at all. However, we have struggled through the year, making sacrifices upon sacrifices until we came within a few dollars of our obligations on World Service. According to reports given in the Fourth Quarterly Conferences, we will make a fine showing when all conditions and circumstances are considered. Several of the brethren have reported in full on World Service but are short in everything else. The special October call was generally responded to and thereby several hundred dollars were added to our collections which otherwise would have been lacking.

Church Schools

Our young people are being well cared for in our district. The Sunday School report is an advance over last year, both in member-

ship and also in method of work done. The Church Schools are becoming more and more efficient each year and the interest displayed by our young people in these schools is evident to the casual observer. We are grading them also in our best charges where the students are sufficiently qualified to be benefited by so doing. However, we are not placing any discount on the international system.

Young People's Work

We regard the Epworth League as pre-eminently the young people's work, yet we also urge that the older people attend the services. Progress is being made in our League work yearly. The Epworth League Convention this year was a decided improvement over last year, though the last year's meeting was fine. The papers and the discussions of them were the best imaginable.

Education

The educational facilities of our district will probably surpass that of any of the other districts. Among these facilities is Bennett College for Women. This is a unique institution and is exceptionally equipped. Its growth since the change of work, just four year ago, is phenomenal. There have been advancements made along all lines yearly. From the president down through the entire working force there has been discernable improvement. We are very proud of the work that is being done by President Jones and his efficient corps of teachers and helpers. There seems to be nothing omitted that belongs to be done by such an institution. Not only is stress put upon book knowledge, but a general education in home-making and community life is emphasized. A week's training in this line is given freely every year. This school for our girls, and Allen Home for both girls and boys, are brought to the attention of our young people throughout the district. Not only so, but we call attention to other schools of other denominations and urge the young people to take advantage of any Christian school.

Material Improvement

The work of building and improving the churches and parsonages has not been so good this year because of the lack of finances caused by the financial depression of the entire country. Yet at a few points we have made wonderful material improvement. On the East Greensboro charge there has been fine work done at Basses Chapel. A large brick veneered church is far on the way of completion. When completed, it will be the best country church in the entire Conference and will surpass a goodly number of the city or village churches. There has been excellent work done on two of the churches of the Empire charge. A commodious and well arranged wooden structure has been completed on the Empire charge at a nominal cost of \$1,200, with all indebtedness paid with the exception of \$157. Also, a snug little home for worship has been finished and dedicated on the same charge at Stout's Chapel. Improvements have been made on the parsonage property of this same charge. A few other points have made slight improvements on the churches and property, such as painting, etc.

Our Retired Brethren

We want to commend to this Conference again our honored retired brethren of the district. We feel the loss of one from our roll this year, Brother J. W. Jones. Yet we know that he is in the safe beyond, where the true servants of the Master reside, in the home prepared by our Saviour for all His faithful followers. We still have on this honored roll Brothers M. J. Bullock, G. W. Byers, L. W. Thomas, and J. H. Garrett. The oldest active member of the Conference, Brother Robert Smith, left us for the Better Land last February. He left a vacancy below but swelled the hosts above.

Evangelism

Many of our churches have had glorious revivals and many souls have been added to the Kingdom. This, we think, is the greatest achievement of the year, for, after all, if we succeed educationally and financially and fail to bring souls into the Kingdom, we failed after all, for the main business of the Church of Christ is to save men and women. He came to seek and to save those that are lost. We, His vice-regents, must do the same.

WESTERN DISTRICT

We are grateful to the Most High that He has permitted us as ministers of the Western District to assemble once more in an annual Conference. We extend courtesy to the former District Superintendent in the person of Brother N. J. Pass. We hail him as a gospel preacher of no mean reputation and an executor of admirable ability. We wish for him the greatest possible success in the ministry.

The Western District feels it owes gratitude to the Board of Bishops for assigning Bishop R. E. Jones to preside at this session of our Conference, who is a member of the same. We gladly welcome him and pledge him our most hearty support and co-operation. He has proven himself to be one among the great bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

We have twenty-three charges in the Western District. These charges comprise 57 Churches. There are a few of these Churches which are not in activity, namely, Beaver Dam, Jefferson, and Some of these Churches are in excellent condition as to structure, but are woefully in debt. The Churches at West Asheville, Forest City, Shelby, Cornelius, and Cherryville are greatly embarrassed with debts; yet these Churches, with their energetic pastors, have made heroic efforts to keep the doors open for worship and their creditors satisfied. The Church at Cornelius is a new Church, erected under the leadership of Brother W. C. Cook. The estimated value of our Churches in this district is..... This

The Benevolences

We have from the very beginning of the Conference year urged the claims of the Conference. The World Service Collection will be as much, or possibly more, than the preceding year. I have personally advocated the cause of World Service throughout the district to the best of my ability. I have endeavored to impress every congregation with the importance of giving a part of their earnings to this great cause. All the other claims have been stressed upon, most especially the Conference Claimants and Episcopal Funds; and the report of the pastors will indicate that much has been accomplished in the way of the benevolences of the Conference and Church.

Our Church Schools

The schools within the confines of the Conference are Bennett College for Women and Allen Home. These schools have had our most hearty support, as the reports will show. We have not only attempted to increase the good will and interest in the schools with mere words, but we have substantiated them with our cash. I have never seen a finer spirit for Bennett College for Women than exists today throughout the district. As a school, it is blossoming as the rose of Sharon. The young women of note and ambition throughout the country are coming in droves to secure the fragrance of this institution. All hail to President D. D. Jones for his marvelous and wonderful leadership in this great institution.

Our Activities

The group meeting, as we called it, convened at Marion in November of last year. It was a very important and interesting meeting. Many of the pastors did not get there because of snow and ice. But we who did come framed up the book for the Conference year and gave some money for educational causes.

The district meeting at Boone, in April, was inspiring and impressive. We had a great spiritual awakening on this occasion, and the pastors reported over a thousand dollars in cash for World Service. This meeting left a very wholesome impression for Methodism in this section of the country.

The District Convention

The Epworth League and Sunday School Convention was held in Cherryville the first of June. We had a fine group of young men and women who composed the personnel of this Convention. In this Convention great stress was placed upon the duty and responsibility the young people owe to their Church and community; and much interest was evidenced by the young people themselves by way of large attendance and splendid rendition of subjects which had been previously placed in their possession for study and development. The addresses, recitations, and other recitals deserve special mention and commendation in the behalf of our young people for their vigorous activities in the Western District. We extend congratulations to the good people of Cherryville for the manner in which they entertained us at this Convention.

The District Conference convened at Philadelphia, one of the churches of which Brother Pass is pastor. The entertainment was all that anyone could desire. The attendance was large and the spirit of the meeting exceedingly gratifying. We raised all of our quota of educational money for Allen Home and a handsome sum for Bennett College for women. There were several visitors, among whom were President Jones of Bennett College for Women; Dr. R. N. Brooks of Gammon Theological Seminary; Prof. C. W. and Mrs. Perry of Clark University, Atlanta, Ga.; Revs. G. M. Phelps, District Superintendent of the Wilmington District; J. E. Brower of Laurinburg, N. C., and R. I. Abernethy of Hamlet, N. C. They all made inspiring as well as helpful addresses.

The Pastors

In the main, they have done what they could for the Master's Cause. They have labored hard and some under unfavorable conditions, yet they have kept the enemy without the folds of the flock and have been able to make marks of advancement in the work of the Master. We have had a pleasant year, working together co-operatively, socially, in kindness and with generosity throughout the confines of the district. Love, peace, joy, and happiness have seemingly been imbued in the heart of every pastor in this district.

The Retired Ministry

Brother J. C. Addie has been feeble. He lost his home and everything he had by fire. He needs special consideration from the Board of Stewards. Brothers J. J. Blanton and S. B. Cornelius are in normal health and doing what they can in their capacity for the cause of the Master.

In Memoriam

Death with his grim monster visited our rank in February and laid hands upon Brother N. M. Martin, our pastor at Marion. His devotion to us caused a bit of sorrow in our rank. He had begun a brilliant year's work in his new field of labor. He leaves to mourn his loss, a devoted wife and two sons. May this Conference ever remember them in prayer and devotion.

The Final

Finally, Mr. Chairman, I am reminded of that famous Highland chief of the noble house of MacGregor, of Great Britain, who fell, wounded by two balls, at the Battle of Preston Pass. The soldiers, seeing their chief fall, wavered and began to lose hope of victory; but the grand old chieftain, beholding the effect of his disaster, raised himself up on his elbows while the blood gushed in streams from his wounds, and cried aloud, "I am not dead, my children; I am looking at you, to see you do your duty."

The ministers of the Western District, when discouraged, disappointed, and defeat seemingly evident in the struggle, ever have felt the presence of the captain of our salvation, who was wounded for our transgressions, bruised for our iniquity, cry aloud, "I am not dead, my children; I am looking at you, to see you do your duty."

With this assurance of leadership, we have fought the battle and have won the victory. I am

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

G. M. PHELPS, District Superintendent.

Dear Bishop, Fathers, and Brother Ministers of the North Carolina Annual Conference:

I count it a pleasure and privilege that it is mine to make my sixth report as District Superintendent of the Wilmington District. Twelve years ago, the annual Conference was held in this building, from which Conference I received my first appointment, and held, until I was placed on the district. After twelve years of service, the record of which I shall leave to speak for itself, I come back to the same place from which I received my first appointment to receive my third appointment.

The five and a half years that I have been privileged to serve on the Wilmington District, I trust, have meant as much to the people I have served as they have to me.

Throughout the Wilmington District I have found a people who are appreciative of service rendered and willing at all times to co-operate in Kingdom building. Some of the greatest sacrifices I have ever seen made have been made on the Wilmington District by its true and faithful workers. Permit me to mention just one other feature which has meant as much or more to the success of the district. I refer to the fine spirit of devotion to their task to the untiring and unselfish service which has been rendered by practically every pastor who has served on the district. From time to time, we may have differed in method, but in objective we have always been one. Because of the co-operation between pastors and laymen during the past five years, there has been an increase of twenty per cent in ministerial support, and benevolent giving. During the past two years there has been a great deal of moving on the part of the members, and yet we have had a decided increase in membership.

For th past two years we have not been able to reach our objective by far, and yet I believe that the efforts have been greater than any other year. This year we have been somewhat handicapped because of sickness and death in our ranks. The Rev. A. G. Jenkins, who was the tireless and faithful pastor of this Church, became sick very early in the spring. From this illness he did not rally, and death claimed him the last of August. Words are inadequate to express his love, devotion, and interest in every phase of church life.

Building

We have been thrown back in our building program because of financial contributions, and yet some of our pastors have pushed

ahead, doing almost the impossible. The Rev. J. C. Rush, after four years of successful service at Maxton, has begun the reconstruction of the old St. George Church, which bids fair of becoming one of the most beautiful structures in that section of the county.

Rev. W. E. Hairston, serving his first year at Lumberton, has done a great work in putting the parsonage in first-class shape.

Rev. J. B. Meekins, pastor at Fayetteville and Red Springs, has been successful in planting our church again in Fayetteville. Upon going there at the close of the Conference last year, he found around twenty-five members worshipping in a dwelling house, which had been made possible through the faithful service of Brother Lloyd McQueen. With this handful of members, in less than twelve months, on the same spot secured and paid for by Brother McQueen, Rev. Brother Meekins has built a nice church, to the cost of \$1,500, and has more than doubled the membership.

Revs. R. C. Little and O. J. Covington are to be commended for the excellent work which has been done at Pembroke and Hickory Bend.

Work Among the Young People

Much of our time has been given over to the young people's work, and we are glad to report that a more heartier response has not come from any source than from this one. In practically every church, school and Epworth League where the young people have been given a chance to co-operate without abuse and criticism, there has been but little trouble in getting them to fall in line with Kingdom building.

In this report, as in the others which we have made for the past four years, we must give credit to the Sunday School and Epworth League Institute, for the part it has played in helping many of the older ones to better understand the young people, also bring it to bear upon the young people, that it is through Christian living that they are able to render the highest type of service in any course they might pursue.

May long live, Dr. F. H. Butler and Dr. H. R. Howard that they might continue this all-important work among the young people.

District Conference

We have made a desperate effort to get out of the old rut in conducting our District Conference. We have used this opportunity to interchange ideas concerning matters that are vital in the life of the Church. One of the subjects discussed last District Conference was the making of the services more attractive. We found that the discussion of such topics not only gave more of us an opportunity to take part in the work of the Conference, but the Conference was more greatly enjoyed by those concerned. We are not satisfied, though, to stop at this. Our hope and prayer is that the day will soon come when we can have one or more special workers visit our Conference and give as much time as possible to the less privileged pastors.

Quarterly Conference

This has given me as much concern as anything else since I have been on the District. When I first reached the District I received several compliments about some of the new ideas that I had brought to the District, but I soon found that these were not sufficient to hold the interest of the quarter. It goes without saying that the pastor is the key to the situation. Where there is a pastor who is wiser than the lawmaking body of our Church and see the District Superintendent as a useless object, moving around every three months to get what he can, irrespective to anybody else, or wherever there is a pastor, saint though he may be, and yet hasn't the ability, nor push to work up a quarterly Conference, the Conference is almost a complete failure. I wish there was some way that some of our most able men could be made to see that as long as they intend to preach in the M. E. Church, it would be better for all concerned to adhere to its program.

Evangelism

The work of Evangelism is greatly hampered, because of the various ideas as to how it is to be done. To add to this difficulty most of us are not able to get our ideas across when given a chance. The people cling to the old way, and yet are not willing to help work it. A few of them are becoming to believe that there is an easier and better way, but rightfully hold to what they have until someone came along able to work another. As pastors, some of us are anxious for an old-time revival and thus we are puzzled to find someone to conduct it. In searching for such a person, we usually become discouraged and pick up most anybody. We start out not expecting to do anything and the people know we are not, and therefore most of them stay at home. The old evangelist is not to return soon. The responsibility has come at last to the door of every pastor to say that we can't do it is to acknowledge that we have chosen the wrong profession. We can do it. We must do it. It is ours to seize the opportunity and, like the disciples of old, add daily to the Kingdom of God.

WINSTON DISTRICT

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

"Sanctified by God the Father and preserved by Jesus Christ and called: To you be multiplied, mercy and peace and love." By your suffrage I am permitted to make my sixth report.

The previous reports have been made under conditions that were a bit tinged with misgivings, not knowing always what the future would bring forth; but today it's different. I'm neither a prophet nor a prophet's son, but I have a sneaking suspicion that you have your mind fully made up to do something to me you have not done before.

Therefore at the seat of this conference I am offering my resignation and point blankly refuse to serve as District Superintendent for the next two years.

This year, Bishop and Brethren, has been the most interesting year—interesting to the ministers to know who you are going to appoint in place of the superintendent you are going to take down and the one that has resigned; interesting to me because of the curiosity that lurks in my mind as to what the harvest will be to me.

This has also been the saddest year. This year we were forced to witness the passing of eight of our comrades who responded to the call of taps; gently they dropped the curtains of their tents and waved us a long goodnight, while we toil and fight on. Yet we eagerly look forward to the time when reveille shall sound and we shall meet on God's eternal camp-ground and to study war no more. Yet God has been good to us, for out of the number smitten by disease, He has given back to us three of our brethren who are now among us and we are glad.

This has been the most trying year, in that it has taxed us to the utmost to make optimism prevail. The previous years have had their hours of vexatious problems, sleepless nights and days of anguish, but this year has been exceptional. It has been no easy task to tell men times will be better when the cloud of unemployment hung like a pall over the nation, and now when the farmer comes to the market with his produce, wrung as it were from the relentless jaws of devastating drought, there given in return for his year's labor not enough to pay his fertilizer bill, much less pay for other goods consumed; disappointed, dejected, despairing, he looks to the Church as much as to say, "Where is the God you preach about and pray to? It has been our task to declare, "God is still in the heavens and does all things well." He still brings the seemingly impossible to pass. He still makes dry land appear in the midst of the sea. He builds national highways in the pathless deserts. In a dry and thirsty land he brings water from the rock and feeds his people on angel-food, Jehovah is His name. Out of this crisis the Winston District has emerged and is here to report, none the worse because of the ordeal through which we have come. Those who have gathered little have none to spare and those that have gathered much have none to scatter. None of us has our wants supplied, but are thankful for some of our needs. Many of our men have not had three months' work out of twelve; the women have been the mainstay of the family and the church, and out of their meager earnings they have given to the church.


In my sojourn among the brethren this year I have presented every cause, and in no uncertain sound I have attempted to lay upon the heart of each pastor and his officers and the membership at large the tremendous needs of the Church and the necessity of each man, woman and child assuming a reasonable share of the responsibility and each fulfilling their obligation. Some have done what they could

and some have not done at all, not because of indifference but because they couldn't.

As I surrender the District, Bishop, I am abashed that I've not done better. I did not reach my ideal. It is yet to be sought after. This as a legacy I pass on to my successor. However, I feel some progress has been made. In order that there be no comparison with my predecessor—for comparisons are odious—I have made a check-up for the past four years and find there has been a steady gain in membership, both in Church and Sunday School. There has been a gain financially until this Conference year now closing. Our struggle now is to hold at least to the margin of the previous year. Five new parsonages have been built and one new site purchased for a prospective parsonage. Six new churches built, four remodeled, two tracts of land donated for erecting new churches. One of these churches is the last word in architecture as far as the North Carolina Conference is concerned. If you have any misgivings, we extend you a cordial invitation to visit St. Mark's of High Point. These facts mentioned note some temporal gains. If these were all, I would consider very little had been accomplished. My highest aim has been to build a confidence among the brethren that would have them see and feel that the District Superintendent is not an ecclesiastical spy but a brother minister appointed to help the brethren in their varied fields do more effective work in carrying out the program of the general Church. If I have had any success in this particular I feel my labor has not been in vain.

As I give over the District into your hands, Bishop, soon to be entrusted to the hands of another, there are no recommendations attached. I am leaving behind humble homes and faithful souls; big hearts and small ones. There is the good, bad and indifferent, all waiting for the touch of sympathy. If administered wisely, a response will be given that will be gratifying. I leave behind a ministry that awaits a leadership that is sane and fraught with brotherliness. If given, there will be a following and adherence of which you need not be ashamed. Give the best you have and the best will come back to you.

Bishop, if anything has been accomplished worthy of note in my six-year tenure on the District, there is no credit due me. It has been made possible by the loyalty of my brother ministers and their faithful flocks. I wish to thank them for every kindness shown. If anything else has been shown other than kindness, I take it as an error of the head and not the heart. I take with me to my new field of labor the choicest memoirs plucked from the gardens of your affections, resplendent with love, friendship and truth. These shall make my yesterdays dreams of joy and my tomorrows visions of hope.

A resolution adopted by the students, faculty, alumni, and friends of Bennett College, assembled in the chapel, Tuesday, November 4, 1930, on the occasion of the dedication of the Wilbur Steele Hall.

Whereas, The students, faculty, alumni, and friends of Bennett College for Women recognize that it was a sacrifice of no little import on the part of the alumni, students, friends, and founders of Bennett College to give over to the new institution its physical plant and certain material things pertaining thereto, and, above all, a certain very definite tradition of noble service to the cause of Negro advancement; and

Whereas, The faculty, students, alumni, and friends of Bennett College for Women feel that there should be no break between this great tradition and the trends that will actuate and motivate the life of the new institution lately sprung from the old; and

Whereas, There is a genuine feeling of gratitude for the alumni and friends of Bennett for this noble sacrifice;

Whereas, There is a definite desire on the part of all who are interested and concerned in the development of the new Bennett, the Bennett College for Women, for all who are interested and concerned in the maintenance and perpetuation of Bennett College, in order that the latter might know the extent of this sincere feeling; be it therefore

Resolved, That we of the new Bennett College for Women pledge our lives and our abilities and our resources both material and spiritual to the honoring and perpetuation of these great principles long since enunciated by the sons and daughters who toiled that Bennett College might stand as a citadel on the frontier of the cultural advance of the American Negro; and be it further

Resolved, That we put before our friends, new and old, the needs of our institution, Bennett College for Women, asking not that we be given the material means by which we might strive to make our college a model of some existing institution of learning, reaching no higher than to imitate blindly such institutions in their plans and programs, but that we at Bennett College be given the means by which we might experiment in the great field of education and build uniquely an institution dedicated to the advancement of the womanhood of the Negro race in America. Be it further

Resolved, That we put before our friends the inescapable facts that in this, our present era, science, too, must be served, and a certain amount of material prosperity must be assured the institution in order to preserve existing standards of scholarship and of modern civilization. Therefore, be it

Concluded, That we, the faculty, students, and alumni of Bennett College for Women go on record with these sentiments and that a copy of these be spread before the North Carolina Conference and entered into the columns of the denominational journals throughout the country.

From the organization of Methodism in America, the work in North Carolina was continued in Virginia and afterwards in the Virginia and South Carolina Conferences. In the year 1836, the General Conference set up in North Carolina. Its first session opened as a part of the Virginia Conference, but when it adjourned there were two Conferences.

Facts from the first ninety sessions are gleaned from the General Minutes and from the Conference Journal for those years, which is now in custody of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

At the Conference of December 4, 1844, there were 19,495 white members and 3,990 colored. Without consulting the wisdom of the latter, nearly the whole membership became part of a new church, organized in May, 1845, and called the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Some of the colored members entered the A. M. E. Church, some the Colored M. E. Church of America, but thousands turned gladly to the bosom of the old Methodist Episcopal Church as it returned to the State after the Civil War.

Between the years 1844, when the Church was separated over the slave question, and 1865, when at the close of the War the M. E. Church returned to shepherd its scattering flock in North Carolina, there was no session of the North Carolina Conference.

From the North Carolina Conference the Blue Ridge was formed with twelve preachers, 2,839 members and probationers, and 41 church edifices.
