

RULES OF ORDER

OF THE

North Indiana Conference.

Rule 1. The Conference shall meet at 8:30 A. M., spend a half hour in devotional exercises, to be conducted by a member of the Conference appointed by the Bishop, proceed with the business at 9 A. M., and adjourn at 12 M. But the Conference may, in its discretion, alter the time of meeting and adjournment.

RULE 2. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal the question shall be taken without debate, except that the appellant may make a sim-

ple statement of the grounds of his appeal.

RULE 3. All resolutions and motions shall be in writing, if the Pres-

ident, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule 4. When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution introduced and seconded, or a report presented and read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

RULE 5. The motions to Lay on the Table, to Take from the Table,

and for the Previous Question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule 6. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions should intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, namely:

(1.) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn.

(2.) To adjourn.

(3.) To take a recess.

(4.) To lay on the table.

- (5.) For the previous question.(6.) To postpone to a given time.
- (7.) To refer.
- (8.) To substitute.
- (9.) Amendment.
- (10.) To postpone indefinitely.

A motion to amend an amendment shall be in order, and a substitute for both amendments may be received, which substitute may be amended, and, if a substitute be accepted, it shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition.

Rule 7. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address

the President, but shall not proceed until recognized by him.

Rule 8. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule 9. When a member desires to speak to a question of privilege, he shall briefly state the question; but it shall not be in order for him to proceed until the President shall have decided it a question of privilege.

Rule 10. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than ten minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member

choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule 11. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule 12. No member shall absent himself from the service of the

Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule 13. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of the Conference when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule 14. Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons,

shall excuse him.

Rule 15. It shall be in order to move that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending, except in cases in which character is involved, and if sustained by a vote of two-thirds, the question shall be taken.

Rule 16. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except, (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or a vote is being taken; (3) when the question is pending on seconding the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and is still pending; and (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived and no business or debate has intervened.

Rule 17. These rules shall not be suspended except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting.

JOURNAL.

First Day.

WARSAW, IND., April 8, 1886.

The North Indiana Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church convened for its forty-third annual session April 8, 1886, in the Methodist Episcopal Church of Warsaw, Ind., at 8:30 A. M., Bishop William L. Harris in the chair. The Bishop read the seventy-second Psalm and the second chapter of Second Timothy, after which the ninety-first hymn of the Epworth Hymnal was sung—

"Now, let my soul, eternal King."

L. Roberts and E. Holdstock then led in prayer.

Drafts.—A draft was ordered on the Chartered Fund for \$30. A draft was ordered on the Book Concern for \$268, the amount of the dividend to this Conference.

Transfer.—The transfer to this Conference of Jasper I. McCoy, from the North-West Indiana Conference, was read, and he was introduced.

Episcopal Fund.—A committee was ordered, to consist of one from each District, to collect the Episcopal Fund, and the following were appointed: J. Greer, C. H. Wilkinson, H. J. Meck, T. Stabler, C. E. Bacon, S. C. Miller.

Rules of Order.—The Rules of Order, as printed in the minutes of the last session, were adopted as the rules for this session. Communications.—A communication was read from the Board of the Freedmen's Aid Society, giving the apportionment to this Conference at \$1,500, and on motion the Presiding Elders were directed to apportion the above sum to the several Districts.

The Presiding Elders were also directed to apportion the various benevolent collections to the Districts.

A communication was presented from the Freedmen's Aid Society, and one also from the Board of Church Extension, which were referred to the proper committees.

A communication from the President of Boston University, and the annual report of said University, were presented, and referred to the Committee on Education.

A communication from the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, in reference to the observance of a day of prayer for the temperance cause, was presented, and referred to the Committee on Temperance.

A communication was received from D. P. Kidder, Secretary of the Board of Education, which was referred to the Committee on Education.

General Conference Expenses.—Circulars were distributed to the Conference, containing the plan for the entertainment of the next General Conference.

The Presiding Elders were directed to nominate the several committees for each District which are to have charge of raising money for the expenses of the next General Conference.

Church Locations.—The Presiding Elders were also directed to nominate the committees in each District on Church Locations.

Episcopal Fund.—A communication was presented from the Treasurer of the Episcopal Fund, and referred to the Presiding Elders.

Bishop Walden.—Bishop John M. Walden was introduced to the Conference.

Conference Relations.—The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved. That a committee of two from each District be appointed on Conference Relations, and that the Presiding Elders make recommendation in each non-effective case, and such other cases as may arise, to this committee, as to the relation any minister should sustain in the Conference.

On motion of W. S. Birch, it was directed that all members of the Conference who desire a change of relation shall appear before the above committee.

Dr. Hartzell.—The Rev. J. C. Hartzell, Secretary of the Board of the Freedmen's Aid Society, was introduced, and addressed the Conference in the interest of the Society.

Re-Admission of C. Martindale,—Letters were read concerning the condition of the Rev. C. Martindale, formerly a member of this Conference, who was located at his own request by the South-West Kansas Annual Conference, in March, 1884, and, on motion of E. F. Hasty, seconded by R. D. Robinson, he was re-admitted on his certificate of location, and his case was referred to the Committee on Relations.

E. S. Preston.—A communication with reference to the case of the Rev. E. S. Preston was referred to the same committee.

The Committee on Conference Relations was granted leave of absence.

Reports.—On motion of C. G. Hudson, it was ordered that each pastor shall report in open Conference, when his name is called, the amount of money raised for the fifth collection.

Report of Visitors.—The report of the visitors to DePauw University was presented, read, and referred to the Committee on Education.

Collection for Education.—On motion of R. D. Robinson, it was resolved that the collections for education taken this year be given to Fort Wayne College, to include all collections taken for the cause of general education.

Communication.—The report of the Book Committee and the exhibit of the Book Concern, was read, and ordered to be placed on file.

Rules of Order.—The motion adopting the Rules of Order was reconsidered, the ninth rule was amended at the end so as to read, "until the President shall have decided it a question of privilege," and the rules as amended were adopted.

Nineteenth Question.—The Nineteenth Question was taken up—"Who are the superannuated preachers?" and the following were continued as superannuated: P. Carland, H. N. Barnes, J. Maffit, J. C. Medsker, G. W. Bowers, B. Smith, O. V. Lemon, W. Wilson, L. Roberts, R. D. Spellman, R. A. Newton, G. Havens, J. W. Smith, W. Anderson, J. H. McMahon, J. Johnston, N. Gillam, R. Tobey, L. W. Monson, J. Harrison, W. Lash, W. M. Van Slyke.

 - J. Thomas was changed from superannuated to effective.
 - C. Martindale was changed from effective to superannuated.

Eighteenth Question.—The Eighteenth Question was then taken up—"Who are the supernumerary preachers?"—and the relation of R. F. Brewington was changed from supernumerary to superannuated.

Motion was made that the Conference do now proceed to fix the place of the next session, which was laid on the table. **Bishop Walden.**—Bishop Walden addressed the Conference on the Work of the Church in Kansas, and his experience in presiding over the four Conferences in that State.

Adjournment.—The time having expired the Conference adjourned. Notices were given, the Doxology was sung, and the Benediction was pronounced by Bishop Walden.

Second Day.

FRIDAY, April 9, 1886.

The Conference assembled at 8:30, Bishop Harris in the chair. The devotional half hour was conducted by T. Stabler, who gave out the eighty-fifth hymn of the Epworth Hymnal,

"Come, Holy Ghost, our hearts inspire,"

and read from the fifteenth chapter of John's Gospel.

After a number of prayers were offered, the Conference resumed business at 9 o'clock.

Report.—The report of the visitors to Garrett Biblical Institute was presented, received, and referred to the Committee on Education.

Treasurer of A. B. S.—On motion of C. G. Hudson, T. H. C. Beall was appointed to receive the funds for the American Bible Society.

Statistical Call.—The Statistical Secretary made the disciplinary call of charges from which no statistics had been received, or of which the statistics were imperfect.

Presentation.—The Bishop presented to Brother Robinson an easy chair on behalf of the preachers of Muncie District, and a quilt from the Ladies' Sewing Circle of Montpelier Circuit, to which Brother Robinson made a suitable reply.

Preachers' Aid Society.—The hour having arrived for the annual meeting of the Preachers' Aid Society, the Conference ceased business, and resolved itself into the Preachers' Aid Society, the Bishop occupying the chair.

J. Leonard was reported as having been transferred to the West Nebraska Conference.

Adjournment.—On motion, the Conference adjourned. Notices were given, and the doxology was sung. The benediction was pronounced by J. J. Cooper.

Third Pay.

Saturday, April 10, 1886.

The Conference re-assembled at 8:30 A. M. M. Mahin conducted the half hour's devotions. The 173d hymn of the Epworth Hymnal was sung—

"I need Thee every hour."

Brother Mahin led in prayer, and read from the eleventh chapter of the Gospel according to Luke. At 9 o'clock the Bishop began the usual business.

Journal.—The Journal of yesterday's session was read and approved.

Dr. Bayliss.—J. H. Bayliss, editor of the Western Christian Advocate, was introduced to the Conference.

Memorial Service.—On motion of C. G. Hudson, it was resolved that the Conference meet to-morrow afternoon, at 3 o'clock, for a memorial service.

Statistical Secretary.—The accounts of the Statistical Secretary for the past year, were presented, and were referred to the Committee appointed to audit the accounts of the Secretary. The Statistical Secretary made the call as directed by the Discipline.

Introduction.—W. P. Stone, agent of the Western Book Concern, was introduced to the Conference.

Return of Parchment.—The ordination parchment of Levi C. Huff, a local Deacon, was returned to the Conference, he having withdrawn from the ministry of the Church, and it was ordered that the same be duly filed among the papers of the Conference.

Twentieth Question.—The Twentieth Question was resumed—"Was the character of each preacher examined?" Richmond District was represented, and the characters of the following Elders were passed: W. S. Birch, R. B. Powell, L. A. Retts, C. Harvey, R. S. Reed, J. W. Welch, T. M. Guild, H. N. Herrick, J. H. Ford, W. Peck, E. L. Semans, C. E. Bacon, R. M. Barnes, J. W. Lowrey, M. Mahin, M. H. Mendenhall, H. Woolpert, J. E. Earp.

The case of I. M. Woolverton was referred to a Committee of Inquiry of three, consisting of J. W. Welch, E. Holdstock, and J. Greer.

D. M. Brown.—The Committee of Inquiry, called in the case of D. M. Brown, in accordance with the direction of the last session of this Conference, presented their report, which was received and adopted. • (See reports.)

In accordance with the recommendations of the said Committee, the character of D. M. Brown was passed, and he was granted a location at his own request.

Third Question.—The Third Question was taken up—"Who remain on trial?" James A. Beaty, Leroy M. Krider, George S. V. Howard, Alfred L. Forkner, Eli Davis, William W. Brown, and Sennoske Ogata were continued on trial. Brother Ogata was continued with the understanding that he was to be transferred to the Japan Conference, if he has not been already so transferred.

Fifth Question.—The Fifth Question was then called — "Who are admitted into full connection?"—and Henry Bridge, Ernest E. Neal, Samuel L. Johnson, William F. Cook, and Eli R. Small, having answered the Disciplinary Questions, and having passed a satisfactory examination in their studies, and being duly recommended, were admitted into full connection. Brother Small is to be examined in Harmon's Introduction next year.

Eighth Question.—The Eighth Question was considered—"What traveling preachers have been elected Deacons?"—and Samuel L. Johnson, William F. Cook, and Eli R. Small were elected to Deacon's orders, Henry Bridge and Ernest E. Neal being local Deacons.

Fourteenth Question.—The Fourteenth Question was taken up—"What traveling Deacons have been elected Elders?"—and the following, having been reported as having passed a satisfactory examination in their studies, were elected to Elders' orders: Cyrus U. Wade, Alfred S. Rogers, James C. Murray, Charles H. Murray, Somerville Light, Léwis A. Beeks, Frederick M. Stone, Orange V. L. Harbour, John W. Bowen, Jasper I. McCoy, and William F. Cooke, the last being under the Missionary Rule.

Tenth Question.—The Tenth Question was then called—"What local preachers have been elected Deacons?"—and George S. V. Howard, recommended by the Kokomo District Conference, was elected to Deacons' orders.

Sixteenth Question.—The Sixteenth Question was taken up— "What local Deacons have been elected Elders?"—and Moses L. Campbell, recommended by the Warsaw District Conference, was elected to Elders' orders.

W. 0. Butler.—William O. Butler presented his credentials as an Elder in the Church of the United Brethren in Christ, and being duly recommended by the Waterloo Quarterly Conference, and having answered the usual questions, was recognized as an Elder in the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Visitors' Report.—The report of the visitors to Fort Wayne College was received, and referred to the Committee on Education.

Stewards' Report.—The Board of Stewards made their first report, fixing the bases of the various allowances for the claimants on the Conference funds. The basis of C. Martindale was put at \$300, by the order of the Conference, and the report as amended was adopted.

Western Christian Advocate.—The Rev. J. H. Bayliss, editor of the Western Christian Advocate, then addressed this Conference in the interests of that paper. At the close of his remarks, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"The Ministers of the North Indiana Conference, having heard with pleasure the address of Dr. J. H. Bayliss, representing the interests of the paper of which he is the editor, they hereby express their appreciation of the Western Christian Advocate, which, under the present editorial and financial management, comes to them enlarged and improved.

"They would deprecate any movement formally proposed, which, under certain conditions, contemplates the publication of a local Methodist Advocate, as being in conflict with the publishing interests of the Church, and

crippling the circulation of the authorized Church Advocates.

"They moreover pledge themselves to renew their efforts to increase the subscription list of the Western Christian Advocate in their respective charges."

The time of the session was extended.

Introductions.—William Runyan, of the Cincinnati Conference was introduced. H. A. Gobin, Professor of Greek in DePauw University, was introduced, and addressed the Conference in the interest of the School of Theology of DePauw University. J. P. D. John, Professor in DePauw University, was also introduced.

Leave of absence was granted to T. C. Neal for the day.

District Conference Records.—H. M. Lamport, R. S. Reed, and T. H. C. Beall were appointed a committee to examine the records of the various District Conferences.

John W. Ray, Treasurer of DePauw University, was introduced to the Conference, and spoke concerning the notes given to that institution by the members of this body.

Adjournment.—On motion, the Conference adjourned. Notices were given. The long meter doxology was sung. William Runyan pronounced the benediction.

Fourth Day.

SUNDAY, APRIL 11, 1886.

According to resolution, the Conference assembled at 3 P. M., for a Memorial Service in honor of the members and the wives of members of this body who have died during the past year. Bishop Harris occupied the Chair.

The choir sang—

"We shall meet beyond the river,"

and G. W. Bowers led in prayer.

J. Colclazer.—The Secretary read the memoir of Jacob Colclazer, and remarks were made by E. Holdstock, F. T. Simpson, and D. C. Woolpert. All united in singing—

"Shall we gather at the river?"

- A. M. Kerwood.—The memoir of A. M. Kerwood was read by H. N. Herrick, and remarks were made by R. D. Robinson, and J. S. McCarty.
- Mrs. J. W. Smith.—W. H. Daniel read the memoir of Mrs. J. W. Smith.
- Mrs. B. Wayman.—C. G. Hudson read the obituary of Mrs. B. Wayman.
- Mrs. J. J. Cooper.—The memoir of Mrs. J. J. Cooper was read by H. N. Herrick.

Adjournment.—After the ordination of the Elders the doxology was sung, and after the benediction had been pronounced by Bishop Harris, the Conference adjourned.

Fifth Pay:

Monday, April 12, 1886

. The Conference convened at 8:30. M. H. Mendenhall conducted the devotions, giving out—

"What a friend we have in Jesus,"

after which he led in prayer, and then read the fifteenth chapter of John's Gospel. At 9 o'clock Bishop Harris took the Chair, and the Conference proceeded with its business.

Journal.—The Journal of Saturday's session, and of the memorial session, was read and approved.

Memoirs.—The memoirs read at the memorial session were adopted, and ordered printed in the minutes.

Certificate of Ordinations.—The Bishop presented the following certificate of ordinations:

M. S. Terry.—M. S. Terry, Professor in Garrett Biblical Institute, was introduced to the Conference, and represented that institution.

National Association of Local Preachers.—A communication was presented from the National Association of Local Preachers, which was referred to the Presiding Elders.

A. B. S.—A communication from the Agent of the American Bible Society was received and referred to T. H. C. Beall.

Bishop Bowman.—Bishop Harris conveyed to the Conference the salutations of Bishop Bowman, and the hearty assurances of his love and kindly remembrance for the Conference, of which he was once a member.

Auditing Committee.—The committee appointed to audit the accounts of the Secretary for the past year presented their report, which was received and adopted. (See reports.)

Boundary Commissions.—J. E. Ervin moved that a commission of five be appointed to confer with a like commission from the North-West Indiana Conference concerning the adjustment of the boundary between the two Conferences, which motion prevailed.

On motion of J. E. Ervin, the above motion was reconsidered by a vote of 46 to 32, and the motion was withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the seconder. R. D. Robinson moved that a commission of five be appointed to confer with a like commission from the South-East Indiana Conference concerning the adjustment of the boundary between the two Conferences, and, after discussion, the motion was laid on the table.

Thirteenth Question.—The Thirteenth Question was taken up—"Who are the traveling Deacons of the second class?"—and the following, having been represented as having passed a satisfactory examination in their studies, having been duly recommended by their Presiding Elders, had their characters passed, and were advanced to Deacons of the second class: Isaac W. Singer, Andrew C. Gruber, Mitchell S. Marble, John B. Alleman, Thomas D. Tharp, Leander E. Knox, George M. Carpenter, William M. Stranahan, Albert A. Pittenger, James N. McCurdy.

W. C. Davison.—W. C. Davison, of the North-West Indiana Conference and Missionary to Japan, was introduced.

Twentieth Question.—The Twentieth Question was resumed, and the Committee of Inquiry into the case of I. M. Woolverton presented their report, which was received and adopted. (See reports.) In accordance with the report of the said committee, the character of I. M. Woolverton was passed, and he was granted a supernumerary relation.

Nineteenth Question.—The Nineteenth Question was resumed—"Who are the superannuated preachers?" The characters of the following were passed, and they were continued in the superannuated relation: T. Sells, J. P. Nash, I. Cooper, I. N. Rhoades, E. M. Baker, N. T. Peddycord, J. W. Miller.

E. S. Freeman was changed from superannuated to supernumerary.

Thirty-third Question.—The Thirty-third Question was taken up—"Where shall the next Conference be held?" Knightstown, Broadway, Logansport, Marion, and Union City were nominated. After representation Union City was withdrawn, and Marion was

selected as the place of the next session by a vote of 69 to 61 in favor of Knightstown, and by motion of H. N. Herrick, the choice of Marion was made unanimous.

Eighteenth Question.—The Eighteenth Question was resumed "Who are the supernumerary preachers?" The following were continued as supernumerary: W. H. Pierce, A. G. McCarter, S. C. Miller, J. W. Lewellen, G. B. Work, W. O. Pierce.

D. D. Powell was granted a supernumerary relation on account of disabilities in his family.

The relation of W. R. Jordan was changed from supernumerary to superannuated.

- E. S. Preston was located by a vote of 87 to 10.
- Y. B. Meredith was changed from supernumerary to superannuated.
- A. H. Kistler was changed from supernumerary to effective, and was granted a location at his own request.
 - F. A. Robinson was changed from supernumerary to effective.
 - C. W. Church was changed from effective to superannuated.
 - J. M. Rush was changed from effective to supernumerary.

Report on Education.—The report of the Committee on Education was presented, and that part thereof relating to DePauw University was received and adopted. (See reports.)

Leave of absence was granted to M. Wayman.

Introductions.—A. P. Meade, of the Wisconsin Conference, was introduced. A. H. Gillett, agent of the Sunday-School Union, was introduced, and addressed the Conference concerning the interests of the Sunday-School work.

Adjournment.—The time having expired, notices were given, and the doxology was sung. M. S. Terry pronounced the benediction, and the Conference adjourned.

Sixth Day.

Tuesday, April 13, 1886.

The Conference re-assembled at 8:30. The devotions were conducted by A. H. Currie, who read the thirty-seventh Psalm, gave out the 770th hymn—

"I love thy kingdom, Lord,"

and led in prayer.

At 9 o'clock, the Conference resumed business, Bishop Harris in the Chair.

Journal.—The Journal of yesterday's session was read and approved.

W. S. Boston and D. D. Powell were granted leave of absence.

Second Question.—The Second Question was taken up—"Who are admitted on trial?" The following persons, having been duly recommended by the proper bodies, having been introduced to the Conference, having given the usual pledge on the subject of the use of tobacco, having been reported as having passed a satisfactory examination in the preparatory studies, and having been duly represented by their Presiding Elders, were admitted on trial: Albertus T. Briggs, recommended by the Berry Street Quarterly Conference; Noah Branderbury, recommended by the Monroe Quarterly Conference,

Alphonso L. Lamport, recommended by the Osceola Quarterly Conference; Edmond F. Albertson, recommended by the Kokomo District Conference; Lewis Reeves, recommended by the Dunkirk Quarterly Conference; Alfred E. Sarah, recommended by the Red Key Quarterly Conference; James M. Lewis, recommended by the Locust Street Quarterly Conference, of Greencastle, Ind.; and Charles H. Beechgood, and Lewis A. Sevits, recommended by the Warsaw District Conference.

Committee.—On motion, T. Stabler, M. Mahin, and H. J. Meck, were appointed a committee to prepare a suitable response to the salutation of Bishop Bowman.

Statistical Report.—The Statistical Secretary read the summary of General Statistics No. 1, and the report was received and adopted.

Auditing Committee.—The report of the Auditing Committee on the accounts of the Statistical Secretary was presented (see reports), and a collection was taken to defray the expenses of the said Secretary, amounting to \$14.15.

Nominations of Committees.—The Presiding Elders presented their nominations for the standing committees for next year, the committees of examinations, and for the other committees they had been directed to nominate, and the report was received and adopted. (See lists of committees.)

Stewards.—The Stewards distributed the funds to the various claimants.

Missionary Sermon.—On motion of C. King, it was ordered that the Committee on Public Worship next year provide to have the annual missionary sermon preached in the evening.

Reports.—The report of the Committee on Education was resumed, the remainder thereof read and adopted. (See reports.)

W. F. Yocum.—The Bishop was requested to appoint W. F. Yocum as President of Fort Wayne College.

Temperance.—The report of the Committee on Temperance was read. On motion of R. D. Robinson, the words, "which we can not prevent," were stricken out; and on motion of the same, the words "advocate of temperance" were substituted for "temperance evangelist." The report as amended was adopted. (See report.)

On motion of C. King, the officers of the Conference Corporation, together with R. D. Spellman, were directed to present this report on temperance to the next session of the Legislature of the State of Indiana.

Leave of absence was granted to R. D. Spellman.

The Stewards presented their report, which was received and adopted. (See reports.)

The report of the Committee on Sunday-Schools was received and adopted. (See reports.)

The report of the Sunday-School Society was presented, which was received and adopted. (See reports.)

The Committee on the Tract Cause presented their report, which was read and adopted. (See reports.)

The report of the Committee on the Freedmen's Aid Society was received and adopted. (See report.)

The report of the Committee on the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society was received and adopted. (See reports.)

The Committee on the Woman's Home Missionary Society presented their report, which was received and adopted. (See reports.)

The nominations made by the Presiding Elders for the Committee on Sunday-Schools were reconsidered, and withdrawn, in consequence of the resolution in the report of the Sunday-School Society, asking that the officers of that Society be the Committee on Sunday-Schools.

Printing Minutes .- The following was adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to publish 2,500 copies of the Minutes of this session, as the official Journal of this Conference; that the Minutes be sent to the Presiding Elders in quantities proportioned to the number of members in full connection in each District; that the Presiding Elders distribute them to the preachers in charge in proportion to the number of members in full connection in each charge, and settle with the Secretary within sixty days after they receive the Minutes; that each preacher be required to pay for his Minutes at the time he receives them; that the Secretary be hereby authorized to include in estimating the cost of the Minutes, the expenses of any blanks, and any incidental expenses that either he or the Statistical Secretary may necessarily incur.

Response to Bishop Bowman.—The following was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That this Conference expresses its regret that Bishop Bowman was not able to fulfill his intention of visiting this Conference, which would have given the Conference profound pleasure; and we further say that it would give us unfeigned joy to have the Bishop visit us at any future time; and that we will pray that he may be spared many years to serve our beloved Church.

Resolved, That the Presiding Elder of the District and the Pastor of the station, in which the next session of this Conference shall be held, be hereby directed to prepare and print a programme of services and anniversary exercises, and that they be requested to arrange for as many sermons and gospel meetings as possible.

Adjournment.—On motion of C. G. Hudson, it was resolved that when we adjourn, we adjourn to meet at 1:30 this afternoon. On motion, the Conference adjourned. The doxology was sung, and J. W. Welch pronounced the benediction.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

According to adjournment, the Conference met at 1:30 P. M., M. Mahin in the Chair. J. J. Cooper read the thirteenth of First Corinthians, gave out the first hymn—

"O for a thousand tongues to sing,"

and led in prayer. The reading of the Journal was deferred until the Bishop should arrive.

Report.—The Committee on District Conference Records presented their report, which was received and adopted. (See report.)

Resolution of Thanks.—The following resolution was unanimously adopted by a rising vote:

Resolved, That the North Indiana Conference do hereby tender their heartiest thanks to the kind members of our Church in Warsaw, and to the people of this city generally, who have so hospitably and excellently enter-

tained us in their homes; to the choir for their faithful attendance, and the excellent music with which they have delighted us; and to Brother Mahin and the Committee of Entertainment for their patient and unceasing attention to our every want.

Resolution on Worldly Amusements and Practices.—The following resolution was unanimously adopted, and, by request, the congregation present endorsed the sentiment of the resolution by rising to their feet:

Whereas, The painful fact confronts us that in many of our charges there seems to be an increasing tendency to worldly practices, such as attendance upon theaters, circuses, horse-races, and skating rinks, also attendance upon, and taking part in, dancing, progressive euchre, and other such parties; therefore,

Resolved, That we consider such practices a plain violation of the solemn promises made at baptism, and when received into full membership in the Church; and that it also clearly seems to us that they prevent personal piety, and destroy a relish for the means of grace; and there should be uniformity among our pastors and people in calling to an account any members of our Church, who may be unwilling to refrain from the above practices, after they have been faithfully labored with in the manner prescribed by the discipline.

It was directed that the assessment of \$1,000 for Education be apportioned to each District at the rate of one-half of the apportionment to each for Church Extension, and the Secretary was directed to insert such apportionment in the list of apportionments.

Bishop Harris.—The following resolution was unanimously adopted by a rising vote:

Resolved, That we very highly appreciate the able and courteous presidency of Bishop Harris over our Conference sessions, and we express the earnest prayer that a kind Providence may spare his life for many more years of valuable service in the Episcopal office.

REPORTS.

On Education.

Your Committee submit the following report by the visitors appointed by your body to DePauw University, and adopt it as their report to you.

DePauw University.

The visitors to DePaww University, appointed at the last session of Conference, would submit the following brief report: We visited the University during commencement week in June, and take pleasure in reporting to the Conference a most favorable condition of the Institution. We observed with pleasure the largely increased attendance of students, and the very satisfactory manner in which they acquitted themselves. The enlarged and increased facilities of the University, for its purposes, were particularly noticed.

To the Institution have been added a School of Music and Art, and a Department of Law. New buildings have been erected as follows: Art and Music Hall; the McKim Observatory; Ladies' Dormitory; Gentlemen's Dormitory, and an addition to West College, all of which are of very great importance and necessity. Additional grounds have been purchased as follows: University Park at a cost of \$20,000; East Park, at a cost of \$11,000; and South Park, at a cost of \$80,000.

The total cost of new buildings, grounds and other improvements, is about \$195,000, the greater part of which has been furnished by Hon. W. C. DePauw, and the liberal citizens of Greencastle and the State.

The Law School, under Judge A. C. Downey, started out with excellent prospects and had a prosperous year.

The Music and Art departments were well patronized and closed a successful year. Both these departments give promise of being very successful.

The Normal department was organized at the first of this year, with favorable prospects. In the Department of Physics, in charge of Prof. Demotte, extensive improvements have been made, and much valuable apparatus purchased, which brings that department up to a proper standard of excellence. The signal service station recently established brings the University into prominence, and is an important item. Among the noticable wants of the Institution are buildings for the Schools of Law and of Theology.

The grounds around the buildings should be improved, and brought to a higher state of perfection.

These and other improvements necessary will create a demand for means.

We most earnestly commend the Institution and all its interests to the
Conference, invoking sympathy and aid in every way.

Fort Wayne College.

In regard to Fort Wayne College, also, your Committee present the report of the visitors appointed to that Institution by you.

Your Committee of Visitors appointed to ascertain the condition and needs of the Fort Wayne College respectfully report as follows:

We find the Institution efficiently conducted in accordance with its charter and with the provisions of the Discipline.

The President, W. F. Yocum, is supported by a corps of teachers well qualified for their duties, and successful in their several departments of instruction. The course of study has been revised and enlarged, so that students are thoroughly prepared for entrance upon the sophomore class of the DePauw University, or of other reputable colleges, in either the classical or scientific course of study. A curriculum is also provided whereby students who, for want of time, money, or inclination, can not be induced to take a full university course, may be qualified for the various pursuits of business life.

The patronage of the school has been about the same as formerly. The average attendance is about 150.

The moral and religious influences in the College are marked. A daily prayer meeting is sustained, and a deep religious feeling prevails may safely entrust their sons and daughters to the care of the faculty.

The needs of the College are most conspicuous in the lack of suitable dormitories, or cottage homes for young ladies, and the scarcity of means to put the grounds and old buildings in proper condition. With an additional outlay of \$10,000, the Fort Wayne College would be placed in a condition to do academic work of the highest possible grade, preparing students for the higher Institutions of the Church, and for positions of usefulness and honor in all departments of business life.

The attention of the preachers is urgently called to the duty of sending students to this school of the church, recognizing the Fort Wayne College as peculiarly the educational institution of the North Indiana Conference.

Rev. C. W. Lynch in place of A. W. Lamport, resigned.

Hon. R. Wes. McBride in place of Thos. Rodgers, resigned, and R. D. Robinson, John M. Miller, F. T. Simpson, G. W. Brackenridge and C. S. Smith, whose terms of office now expire, to be their own successors. Your committee also recommend the appointment of S. J. McElwee and J. B. Carns as visitors to Fort Wayne College.

Garrett Biblical Institute.

We also submit the report of the visitors to Garrett Biblical Institute: The commencement exercises of Garrett Biblical Institute were opened with a baccalaureate and inaugural sermon from Dr. M. S. Terry, Professor of Old Testament Exegesis.

The clear and eloquent manner in which he presented the subject of "Hebrew Revelation" awakened an interest that was maintained throughout the different exercises of the occasion.

C. W. Bennett, Professor of Historic Theology, and C. F. Bradley, of the Chair of New Testament Exegesis, delivered their inaugural addresses as newly elected professors—on Monday evening, and made a very fine impression.

At a meeting of the Alumni Association, on Tuesday, a committee of five were appointed to raise an Alumni fund for increasing the Institute library, and \$1,000 was afterward pledged to this fund.

The examination of classes was very thorough on the part of the professors, and very creditable on the part of the students.

The Conference visitors being organized, adopted a report to the Board of Trustees, which sets forth the highly prosperous condition of the Institute.

The Board were congratulated on their wisdom in securing the new professors, Drs. M. S. Terry, C. F. Bradley and R. L. Cumnock, and the election of the new President, Dr. Ridgway. They expressed their appreciation of the efforts made by the faculty to raise the standard of scholarship and so extend the course of study as to make the degrees and diplomas of this Institute equal, or superior, to those of any other theological school.

They set forth the urgent need of a new building to be used for the library, chapel and recitation rooms, and rejoiced that steps had been taken for the immediate erection of such a building. They recommended that ef forts be made to provide for library purposes \$1,000 a year, for ten years, by securing the names of 100 persons who will give \$10 each annually for that period. The outlook of the Institute was never more encouraging, and is the prophecy of great things for Methodism.

On Temperance.

We do most heartily endorse the strong and strictly just language of Bishop R. S. Foster, in setting forth the iniquity of the liquor traffic, and in urging to united action against it, as follows:

"That diabolical conspiracy, that nameless 'monstrum horrendum' of 'Christian civilization, that mothers nine-tenths of the woes and sorrows 'which blight and curse our modern age, and hides its deformity under 'forms of law. How long shall the face of our Christian age blister with this worse than pagan shame? Has the virtue of our time degenerated 'so low, that we do not even blush at the legislated traffic in the souls of our 'own children; that by the very doors of our houses, and our temples, an 'army of miscreants should, by authorization of laws made by Christian 'law-givers, prosecute a work of murder and death? Are we reduced to 'the shame of admitting that a civilization that has grown up about our 'altars is impotent to cure evil? How can we go to the heathen with this 'cancer of worse than heathen infamy festering in our bosom? If ever 'the pulpit had the right, the duty to speak out, it is here."

Therefore, as a Conference of Christian Ministers we declare,

- 1. That we do heartily approve of the continued use of every measure adopted in the past by wise and earnest temperance people, if they are still found to be efficient in contributing to the speedy overthrow of this "diabolical conspiracy."
- 2. We hereby notify all political parties and people that we do most solemnly and emphatically protest against all license laws, whether 'high license 'or 'low license,' or any other law which does in any manner legalize, and thereby tend to make respectable, this infamous business, and if such continue to exist or may hereafter be enacted, we only submit to them as we would to any other iniquitous legislation.
- 3. We especially declare that, while we earnestly and sincerely desire to recognize the rights of all men, yet we must kindly say that we are not satisfied with the attitude of any Methodist Ministers or laity who favor even temporarily the "license system;" or who do not stand squarely in favor of the recommendation of our last General Conference, as found in paragraph 554 of our Discipline; or who are unwilling to accept and proclaim as their motto, "Voluntary total abstinence from all intoxicants as the true ground of personal temperance; and complete legal prohibition of the traffic in intoxicating drinks, as the duty of civil government."

4. We furthermore declare it to be our fixed purpose to vote, and in all proper ways to use our influence, according to our best judgment in the fear of God, so as to most speedily and surely unite the entire temperance element of our country for the legal prohibition throughout the nation of the accursed liquor traffic; and we deem it to be unkind and very unchristian if any of our Methodist people may refuse to respect and financially support any of our Ministers for so doing; therefore—

Resolved. That we do most earnestly request and urge the next General Assembly of Indiana to submit a prohibitory amendment of the Constitution to a vote of the people, forever prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage in said State, and that we also favor the enactment by the Legislature of a general local option law, to be used during the pending of such proposed amendment.

Resolved, That we reiterate our endorsement and hearty recognition of the noble work being done by the "Woman's Christian Temperance Union."

Resolved, That we commend the Rev. R. D. Spellman, to the various temperance organizations for employment as an advocate of temperance.

Resolved, That we unite with the "Woman's Christian Temperance Union" in most respectfully requesting the "International Committee of the Evangelical Alliance," to set apart one entire day of THE WEEK OF PRAYER to be devoted to prayer for the abolition of the liquor traffic.

We, the committee called together by the Presiding Elder of the Richmond District, W. S. Birch, to whom was referred the case of the Rev. D. M. Brown, Missionary at Las Vegas, New Mexico, by the last Annual Conference, met in Richmond, Indiana November 17, 1885, and after carefully examining the evidence, consisting of correspondence, etc., in hand, beg leave to make the following report:

- 1. That a letter written by the Rev. D. M. Brown to the Rev. W. S. Birch, dated September 9, 1885, embracing the latest facts, states that he is not in accord with some of the doctrines of the Methodist Episcopal Church, but does not state the points of divergence.
- 2. That having examined all the correspondence relating to the case, and also an abstract of his farewell sermon at Las Vegas, New Mexico, we, because of the indefiniteness of their statement, do not find sufficient basis for a bill of charges.

3. That from the Superintendent of the Mission, the Rev. Thos. Harwood, we learn that Brother Brown's attitude toward our Church has been most friendly, and his moral character above reproach.

Therefore, we recommend that his character be passed, and that he be granted a location at his own request.

MEMOIRS.

The Rev. Jacob Colclazer.

Jacob Colclazer was born in Georgetown, D. C., September 22, 1813, and died in Kendallville, December 24, 1885, aged 72 years, 3 months, and 2 days.

He was the child of Methodist parents. In his early boyhood his father removed across the line into the city of Washington. Here he resided until the year 1825, when the family removed to Coshocton county, Ohio. Here Brother Colclazer lived for ten years. In 1835 he came, in company with his brother George, to Indiana, and settled in what is now the city of Logansport which was then a mere Indian trading post.

In his youth his educational advantages were meager, being such only as were afforded by the instructions of an intelligent, pious sister, the Sabbath-School, an attendance for a few months on the free schools of Washington City, by studious habits, and a bright and consecrated intellect. • Perseverance and determination of purpose marked him all his life, and made him a man of good education, and of superior attainments.

Brother Colclazer was converted in Ohio, August 17, 1831, and on the same date united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, which he always loved, ever honored, and to which he gave the services and powers of his life.

Two weeks after his arrival at Logansport, the Rev. J. A. Brouse appointed him leader of a class of thirteen members. April 12, 1836, he received license to exhort, and on the 24th of September of the same year he was licensed to preach, by the Rev. Richard Hargrove, in a little frame church on what is now Third street in the city of Peru. On the same day he was recommended for admission into the traveling connection. He was admitted on trial in the old Indiana Conference, October 23, 1836.

Brother Colclazer's first charge was Deep River Mission, a circuit of endless forests, and hundreds of miles in extent. In 1837 he was sent to the Kalamazoo Circuit, Michigan, as junior preacher, where he had thirty-two appointments, and traveled a territory of 500 miles; 1838, he was sent to Logansport; in 1839 to Fort Wayne, where he built a small frame church on the site of the present Berry Street Church, and organized the First Methodist Sunday-School in the city. In 1840, he was sent to Monticello Circuit. His parsonage was a log cabin of a single room, near the Tippecanoe battle

ground. Here he found and brought into the itinerancy H. N. Barnes and Milton Mahin. In 1841 his work was Dayton; 1842, Frankfort. In 1843, he was sent to Kokomo Mission, and preached his first sermon in one of the two houses then in the town. He also assisted in laying out the original plat of the city.

His fields of labor continue as follows: 1844, Rockville; '45, Roseville, '46, Rochester; '47, Delphi; '48, Covington; '49, Middletown; '50–51, Muncie; '52, Centerville; '53–4–5-6, Presiding Elder of the Goshen District; '57–8–9, Presiding Elder of the West Fort Wayne District; '60, Richmond; '61–2, Roberts' Chapel, Indianapolis; '63–4, Logansport; '65, Wabash; '66–7, Peru; '68, supernumerary; '69, superannuated; '70–1, St. Paui, Peru; '72–3, Warsaw; '74, Berry Street, Fort Wayne; '75–6, New Castle. In 1876 he lost the sight of one eye, and resigned his charge in the middle of the year; '77, superannuated; '78–9, Peru. In 1880, he superannuated on account of the almost total loss of sight in his remaining eye, and continued in that honorable relation as long as he lived. This long and excellent record shows nearly forty-five years of effective service, and over forty-nine years in the ministry. In 1860 he was a delegate to the General Conference at Buffalo.

After his superannuation he removed to Rome City, where he engaged in the book and drug business, and within the last two years he removed to Kendallville.

Brother Colclazer was married August 22, 1839, to Miss Isabella M. Sholtz, of Carrol county, Ind., the Rev. George M. Beswick officiating. Four children were given to this marriage. Two of these passed away in early childhood, and on January 28, 1847, he buried his wife. He was married for the second time, November 5, 1848, to Miss Eliza A. Hathaway, his now bereaved companion. One son was given to this union, who died before his father.

During his superannuation, and the almost total blindness of his later years, our brother was always cheerful and hopeful. None heard him complain. The refining fire of affliction showed him to be the pure and fine gold. He was abundant in labors, as far as his strength and health would permit, and identified himself with every interest of the Church. He was helpful to his pastor, sweet in his spirit, and greatly interested in the work of the Sabbath-School, giving much attention to a Bible class, of which he was the teacher

His final illness was protracted. The nature of his disease was such that much of the time he suffered severe pain, which he bore with the greatest resignation and patience. Those who were with him in the last days of his sojourn say that it was indeed an inspiration to see and hear him. These almost fifty years of service were crowned with a halo of glory and of triumph. Testimonies of peace, of joy, and of vision, made his sick room seem quite on the verge of heaven. He was honored, like Elisha at Dothan, and the cohorts of glory awaited his passage to convey him to the presence of the Savior whom he had loved and served so long.

To his pastor he often testified: "I am resting in the rifted rock.' Concerning his recovery he declared, "I have no will of my own." Of his experience he remarked, "For fifty years I have been wondering how it would seem at the death hour, but while walking through the valley of the shadow of death His rod and staff they comfort me; there is no river here." His dying message to us was, "Tell my Brethren at Conference all is well with me; that the same Jesus I have preached in life was my sure support in death; tell them I love them all." During his last lucid interval, he drew his pastor over near to his mouth, and whispered, "Preach Christ; I have tried so to do." Then with a face beaming with light and joy, he said, articulating with difficulty, "Look, Look! Don't you see them? They're coming, they're coming !-Angels! Angels! A great company! I see mother! I see Thomas! O how beautiful! Transcendent glory! How precious! O such fullness! Majesty! Eternity! How comforting is Christ in this hour of my triumph!" While the cold beads of sweat were standing on his brow he distinctly uttered his last words, "I hear the angels singing! I am almost home." Thus did this saintly man depart to his inheritance.

His funeral services were held in the Methodist church in Goshen, and more than twenty of his Brethren in the ministry gathered to do him honor. His body was laid away by the side of his dear boy, among many who had labored with him in early days, amid the scenes of his first work, in the midst of the people to whom he had devoted years of the strength of his

manhood as the ambassador of Christ.

Jacob Colclazer was a man and a minister whose life and work are his best and most eloquent eulogy. He was a man of power, and great influence, as well as usefulness. As a preacher, he was eloquent, forceable, instructive, and strong. He dealt much on Bible doctrines. His utterances were supplemented by an untarnished Christian character, against which no breath of reproach was ever directed. He was as loval to the Church of hischoice as he was to his God and Savior. He was always industrious, and consistent. While a vein of melancholy often showed itself in his character, he was always resigned and full of trust. His demeanor was that of a true Christian gentleman, and such as adorned and honored the cause he represented. He never forgot who or what he was, or whom he came to proclaim. Although of not more than medium height, and not apparently of remarkable vigor of body or constitution, yet he performed some of the most difficult of our pioneer labor, and prolonged his years of effective service to a length rarely equaled. In the churches he served his name is remembered with the most kindly feeling. Many circuits and stations stand as lasting monuments of his usefulness, monuments better than brass or marble.

As a citizen he was ever interested in the public welfare, and in all the great reforms of the age. All his influence was thrown on the side of uprightness, and his motto was "For God and humanity."

In his family, he was most affectionate and kind. The husband and father was not surpassed by the citizen or the minister of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Others who are here to-day will do him full justice, and can speak from more extended knowledge than the writer. The fathers! Where are they? We enter into the results of their labors, and let us see to it that we carry forward and advance the cause they loved so well, and hand down to our successors the precious trust they have given into our hands. Let us not forget our brother. Such men are precious in this heedless world. Let us emulate his virtues, and do as well if we can.

May our blessed Savior lead his lonely wife gently by the hand into the land of reunion, and restore her to her glorified husband.

The Rev. Abia M. Kerwood.

The Rev. Abia Minor Kerwood, son of Richard Kerwood, was born in Washington county, Pennsylania, August 2, 1812, and died in Muncie, Ind., March 25, 1886, aged 73 years, 7 months, and 25 days.

He was sprung from English ancestry, and came of a long-lived race. He grew to manhood in the place of his birth, working with his father at the blacksmith trade. On arriving at his majority, our brother came to what was then the far west. He embarked on an Ohio river steamboat, and came to Cincinnati, whence he went to Oxford, Ohio, where his brother was living. Here he attended school and worked at his trade. He was married in Preble county, Ohio, in 1840, to Miss Rebecca Peden, whom he had met on his journey to Cincinnati, and who survives him. After his marriage he engaged in mercantile pursuits and farming in Preble county. In 1848, he removed to Wayne county, Indiana, where he engaged in farming and teaching school.

Brother Kerwood was converted in the year 1832, and at once united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, in which he remained in communion and to which he gave the best of his life. He was licensed to preach in 1841, by the Rev. James B. Finley, and served the Church in the local capacity until 1854, when he was received on trial in the North Indiana Conference, at its session in the city of Peru. Of the class of fifteen who were then admitted, the Rev. J. S. McCarty only remains in the effective ranks. Bishop Simpson ordained him as a Deacon in 1857, and Elder in 1862. He

spent forty-five years in the ministry, of which twenty-five were in the effective intinerancy.

His fields of labor were as follows: '54, Muncie Mission; '55, New Corydon; '56-7, Montpelier; '58-9, Portland; '60-1, LaFontaine; '62, Normandy; '63-4, Boxley; '65, Alto; '66, Miami; '67, New Corner; '68-9, Montpelier; '70-1, Camden; '72, Ridgeville; '73, Williamsburgh; '74, Eden; '75, Westfield; '76, Kempton; '77-8, Boxley; '79, superanuated. Upon receiving this relation he took up his residence in Camden, afterward removing to Muncie, where he remained until he passed to his reward above.

Brother Kerwood was a clear and forcible preacher, powerful in prayer, original, logical, apt to teach. He was a good Biblical scholar, strong in his individuality, and ever acceptable to the people he served. During his superannuation he continued to preach, and to do good, whenever and wherever opportunity afforded, visiting his neighbors, and talking to them about the interests of their souls. During his last years he was confined much of the time to his home by the side of his afflicted wife, who had so heroically shared with him the work of the itinerancy, and to whom he was constantly devoted.

For a month previous to his death he suffered from rheumatism, but continued to be about until the 18th of March last, when he had an attack of erysipelas, which proved to be fatal. During his brief illness of a week he could converse but little with his friends, but in all that he did say, he gave them every assurance that he was ready to depart to be with Christ. One of his last utterances was, "Let me die the death of the righteous, and let my last end be like his."

In his early ministry, when streams were not bridged, and churches were few, he uncomplainingly endured the privations, the storms and the cold, with an unselfish devotion. His voice was heard in the cabins of the early settlers, and to many a pioneer he broke the bread of life.

He leaves a wife and five children; three sons and two daughters. One son died some years ago.

His funeral was held in the city of Muncie, on the 28th of March, by his pastor, the Rev. T. Stabler, assisted by the Rev. J. A. Ruley. A very large congregation testified to the esteem and honor in which he was held by both Church and community. His remains were conveyed to Beech Grove Cemetery, to await the glorious hour of the resurrection of those whosleep in Christ. "He rests from his labors and his works do follow him."

Mrs. Cassandra Smith.

Cassandra McKahan, wife of the Rev. John W. Smith, and mother of the Rev. R. H. Smith, both of this Conference, was born in the State of Pennsylvania, April 20, 1818, and died in Albion, Indiana, May 30, 1885, aged 67 years. At the age of 24, in 1842, she was converted under the labors of the Rev. Thomas Bartlett. She immediately became a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church, with which for forty-three years she walked humbly, faithfully, and devotedly, and which she not only adorned but built up and profited.

September 22, 1842, she was married to Brother Smith, who in the mysterious ways of a good and merciful Providence, is called upon to survive her whom he needs so much, although it had often seemed as he would preceed her to the better land. How often the well and strong are called first, while the feeble and the pain-bearers are left to be the last. Our Sister was the mother of one daughter and of seven sons, all of whom are living.

Her illness was protracted, and severe. It continued some nine weeks, and was exceedingly painful, consisting of a diabetic gangrene of one extremity, and terminating in blood-poisoning. This long sickness she bore with the utmost patience, and the sweetest resignation. Her mental faculties were unimpaired up to the very last, as long as she was able to speak. When it became evident that the Savior had determined that he could no longer be without her immediate presence with him in glory, she gave many joyful utterances of assurance. Among them were such as these: "Precious Jesus!" "All is well." "I will meet you at the river, where no farewell tears are shed." Many other testimonies of the same import fell from her lips, and now remain in the hearts of her friends for their consolation.

But her life, long and useful, her long membership in the Church, and her active and unceasing labors, are the best witnesses of her fitness to be forever with the Lord. When, some three years after her marriage, her husband was called of God to enter the work of the ministry, she raised no objection, but went with him cheerfully, as if saying, "Thy people shall be my people, thy God shall be my God, and thy work shall be my work." Her earnest labors, and able assistance to her husband, will never be forgotten, either here, or up yonder. Not only the Churches, of which her husband was pastor, but the other ministers, who have at times been her pastors, and especially her present Presiding Elder, unite in bearing the most gratifying testimony to her worth, her zeal in the cause of the Master, and her especial adaptation to the work to which she and hers were called. She won a host of friends in every charge, and the results of her labors will be traced,

"While life, and thought, and being last, Or immortality endures."

The sons whom she raised to maturity, cherish her saintly memory as a treasure. With them her teachings and prayers linger as a sweet perfume. Her stricken husband, though he sits in pain and feebleness, is consoled by the thought that above she loves and cherishes him a thousand fold more tenderly than ever her unfailing love could do in this world. May they have a day of glad reunion in that land "where the inhabitant thereof shall not say, 'I am sick.'"

The funeral services of Sister Smith were conducted at Albion by her Presiding Elder and former pastor, the Rev. F. T. Simpson, assisted by her pastor, the Rev. M. S. Marble, and the Rev. C. H. Wilkinson, of Wolcottville. The church was appropriately decorated, and a large audience was in attendance. Her remains were laid away in the beautiful village cemetery at Albion, to rest until the glad day "When soul and body shall his glorious image bear."

Mrs. Sarah A. Cooper.

Sarah Ann Cooper, wife of the Rev. J. J. Cooper, was born in Prebel county, Ohio, January 26, 1841, and died in Perrysburgh, Miami county, Indiana, October 7, 1885, aged 44 years, 8 months, and 11 days. She was the daughter of Dr. Cornelius and Jemima Hector.

When she was about ten years of age, her parents removed to Miami county, Indiana, where she resided some fourteen years, until her marriage.

After she had passed her twentieth year, she was soundly converted under the labors of the Rev. J. V. R. Miller, formerly a member of this Conference, whom she always claimed as her spiritual father. She immediately united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, of which she remained a faithful and consistent member during all of her early life.

April 8, 1865, she was married to our bereaved Brother Cooper, and cheerfully entered upon the toilsome lot of an itinerant's wife. One daughter, now about 17 years old, was given to them.

In all the work of the ministry, its labors, its cares, and its interests, she was ever a faithful helpmeet to her husband, ever cheering and sustaining him, and by her wise councils and encouragements contributing to his success. She was active in the work of the Church, in labors abundant, and in love for the Church, its doctrines, and its economy, unceasing.

For some years before her departure to the better life, her strength began to fail, and the evidences of that fell destroyer—consumption—prophesied the end of earthly probation. For over two years she was a great sufferer. Although everything possible was done by the medical skill of her father, and of the physicians where she resided, it was impossible to arrest the onward march of the disease. From day to day, and month to month, she slowly faded away, displaying the greatest patience, never uttering a murmur, soothed by the loving ministrations of husband, daughter, and friends, with alternate hope and shadow, as is the manner of that great scourge—consumption,—until the tardy end drew near. To the very last she retained the full possession of all her faculties, and without a fear, without a tremor, went down into the waters of Jordan. As the waves grew deeper, Divine grace lifted her up, and proved that He was not absent who has promised to be with His people unto the end of the world.

She exhorted her daughter to be faithful, and to meet her in Heaven. She plainly answered the affectionate inquiry of her husband if she suffered any pain by declaring that she felt none at all. Her only anxiety was to see her father's face once more before she went away, a desire which unfortunately was not gratified, as he arrived half an hour after her decease. Soon after these last exhortations she fell so sweetly and softly asleep in Jesus, that the lookers on scarcely knew that she had ceased to breathe.

Her remains were taken to Gilead, the home of her youth, on the 10th of October. Her funeral was preached to a large concourse by the Rev. J. C. Reed, D. D., of Rochester, from the twenty-third Psalm. Her wasted body was laid by the side of two of her sisters, to sleep until the Resurrection morning.

Our ministers' wives die well, just as well as their husbands. May our loving Father, and our Elder Brother give abundant grace and unfailing consolation to our brother, who bears so bravely the burden of so many years, as well as of sorrow, and grant him a glorious reunion in the land of the many mansions.

Mrs. Brejetta Wayman.

Another itinerant's home is desolate, for its light has gone out and left it in darkness.

Brejetta Hoover was the daughter of Leason and Mary Hoover. Her parents were among the early settlers in the State, and with them she shared all the toils, trials, and privations, of pioneer life. She was born in Wayne county, Indiana, August 4, 1817, and died in Goldsmith, Indiana January 23d, 1886, aged 68 years, 5 months, and 19 days.

Her youth, early womanhood, and the first of her married life, were passed in the county of her birth, until she was 39 years old. At the age of 12 she was converted, under the labors of Father Havens, that saintly man of God, whose name has the fragrance of ointment poured forth among the churches. She gave her name and her heart at once to the Methodist Episcopal Church, and for fifty-six years faithfully walked with God, and adorned the Church of her choice. In all of her Christian life she was very earnest and faithful. Hers was no nominal church membership, no mere form of religion, but was ever a true, a deep, a heartfelt work, a godliness having the power as well as the form. There was no deviation in her allegiance to her Heavenly Father, and from the surrender of her heart to her Redeemer she never drew back.

She was married to our sorely bereaved Brother Wayman, February 13, 1834, at the age of 17. A jubilee and two more of years were given to them in this sweet and pleasant marriage relation. In unbroken harmony and tender love they walked hand in hand along life's pathway, from the morning of early youth, through the busy heat and burden of the day, down into

the evening of old age, until the shadows were thrown far aslant. She was a good, true, and faithful wife all these many years, a devoted mother, and a household saint. Quiet, reserved, unassuming, she did her work well. She was the mother of ten children, of whom she committed six into the hands of her Savior until the day she should rejoin them, and four are left to follow in her saintly footsteps.

When, in 1856, Brother Wayman was called of God, to go out with the message of the gospel, she went with him nothing loath, and cheerfully took up the burden at an age when so many think of laying it down. So late in life it seemed doubly hard to go out into the ministerial work, yet she went forth simply, trustingly, content to follow wherever her Master should lead.

For almost thirty years she gave strength and all to the cause of Christ, and made a good, and faithful minister's wife. Her praise in all the Churches, wherever the voice of Providence sent her.

For several years past she has been greatly afflicted. Her eyesight began to fail her, until she could scarcely distinguish any face. During the last two years of her life there developed what proved to be a cancer on her temple, which destroyed the eye, the ear, and the parts adjacent to them. So quietly and uncomplainingly did she bear the pain and unceasing suffering of this terrible infliction, that it was scarcely known among us that she was the subject of the ravages of this terrible disease. Her faith failed not, and she found it true that according to her day so should her strength be. She rested in Jesus every hour. She often testified to the power of the divine grace in this dark trial, and said frequently, "I am ready; all is bright and clear; I do want to go to my heavenly home and be at rest."

The day before she died, slre bade all good by, and then requested every one to leave the room for awhile, for she wanted to be alone with her God. When her husband returned to the sick chamber, after this season of sub-lime communion with her heavenly Father, she said that her cancer did not pain her any more. And thus, in this peace and rest, our Saviour granted her an easy departure to be with him, which is far better.

Her funeral was preached at Goldsmith, by the Rev. A. Cone, of Tipton, and her body was taken to Ridgeville, to be buried, where services were also held, conducted by the Rev. J. W. Lowrey, on January, 24th.

Her long and useful life is finished, but her memory and good deeds shall live after her. May the never failing grace of heaven sustain her aged consort the few more days of his pilgrimage, until he too shall dwell where separations and sorrows never come.
