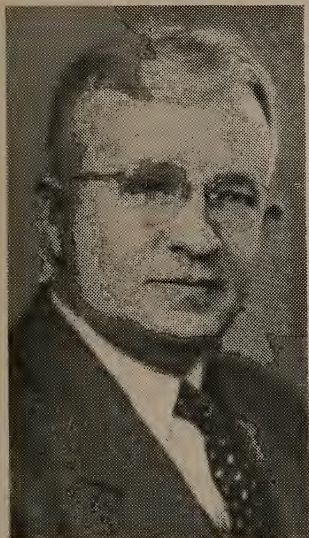

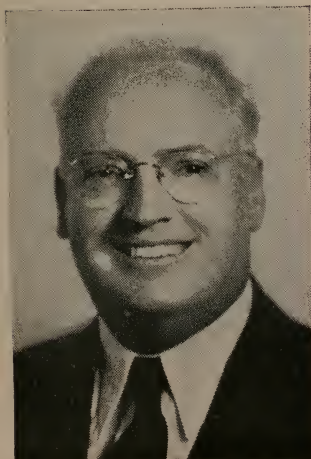

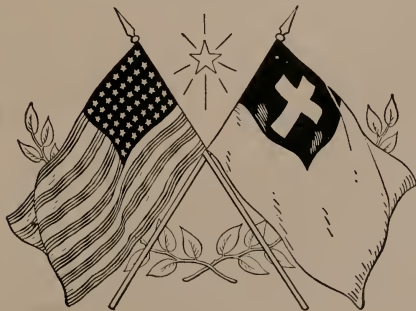

HISTORICAL STATEMENT

Organized Methodism in Illinois began in 1803 (a) (b) when Benjamin Young was sent as a Circuit preacher to this great territory. On visiting the settlements along the Mississippi river he found two classes already formed by local preachers. In 1806 the Illinois Circuit reported 110 members, and in 1811 an Illinois District was formed with five Circuits. In 1824 the Illinois Conference was organized, covering the entire state, the first session of the Conference being held the same year in St. Clair County. At this Conference Bishop Robert R. Roberts presided, and John Scripps was the Secretary. The growth of Methodism in Illinois necessitated a dividing of the state, and in 1852 the Southern Illinois Conference was formed. The first session of the Conference was held at Belleville, St. Clair County, with Bishop E. R. Ames, presiding, and J. Leaton, Secretary. This Conference was destined to hold eighty-eight sessions in separate relation before becoming merged with the Illinois Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South; and the Illinois Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, at Edwardsville, Illinois, September 19, 1939, under the presidency of Bishop Ernest Lynn Waldorf, with Roy N. Kean, Secretary.

In the Court House in Lacon, Illinois, February 11, 1864, (c) the Illinois Christian Union was duly organized. Rev. Ira Morris was elected president and Thomas Alexander was chosen Secretary. Thus a new organization was born in Illinois, out of which was to grow, in part, the Illinois Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. In the same year, the 22nd day of June, at Salem, Illinois, the Evangelical Church in Illinois was organized. Rev. Thomas Middleton was the president and T. D. Deeds, Secretary. Thus a second organization in Illinois was born which was later to contribute to the strength of the Illinois Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. These two organizations met in joint session at Xenia, Illinois, September 21, 1865, and from that session a new church organization was born, taking the name of the Christian Union Church in Illinois.

Early in the year 1867, the separate churches of the newly formed organization voted on the proposal to become a part of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. So nearly unanimous was the vote in support of the proposal that a meeting of the churches was called in Clinton, Illinois, June 17, 1867, for the further consideration of the proposal. At that meeting it was decided that the Christian Union Church in Illinois should adopt the Doctrines and Discipline of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and Bishop D. L. Doggett of that church was notified of their decision.

On October 16, 1867, the group met at Nashville, Illinois, with Bishop D. L. Doggett presiding, and T. D. Deeds, Secretary. At this meeting the former Christian Union Church in Illinois was duly organized as the Illinois Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. This Conference held seventy-three sessions in separate relation, the last one being at Edwardsville, Illinois, September 19, 1939, with Bishop U. V. W. Darlington presiding, and W. T. Mathis, Secretary. Thus closed a long and honorable history and record for the Glory of God and the extension of the Kingdom.

On August twenty-third, 1939, at the Conference Grounds, near Lewis-town, Illinois, (d) the Illinois Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church met for its ninety-sixth and final session under the presidency of Dr. F. B. Hanna. We quote the following from the message of the president to that Conference: "For ninety-six years, almost a century, we have traveled the Methodist Protestant Highway to come at last to the Super Highway of Methodism. Many have dreamed of such a way and of such a day but ours is the realization. Our fathers faced the problems of a divided church, we face the challenge of a united church; they went out of the old, we come into the new. This session will bring to a close our separate existence. We will find ourselves very shortly in three Conferences instead of one. But we will still be 'Workers together with Him.' We will be seeking the lost, yes, kindly entreating those who have gone astray, our task will be the same."

With the fact of Unification at Kansas City, Mo., in May 1939, a new advance of Methodism in Illinois became a reality, when the three great bodies of Methodists who had walked in separate ways entered upon a new experience in a common fellowship on the "Super Highway of Methodism." At Edwardsville, Illinois, September 20th the same year, the long awaited event happened and three great bodies of earnest Methodists joined hands and hearts for a common advance as the Southern Illinois Conference of The Methodist Church. This historic occasion was under the presidency of Bishop Ernest Lynn Waldorf, and that of Associate President Bishop U. V. W. Darlington, and the able assistance of Dr. F. B. Hanna, with Roy N. Kean, Secretary. Thus the Southern Illinois Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Illinois Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Illinois Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, entered into a new crusade to win souls to Jesus Christ and for the extension of His kingdom.

The Secretary of the Conference read the names of the deceased Ministers, and Minister's Wives. F. O. Wilson led in prayer. H. E. Burge preached the Memorial Sermon using as his theme "Wherefore God is not ashamed to be called their God."

Communion Service—The service of Holy Communion was observed with Bishop Magee leading in a ritualistic service. Bishop Magee and the District Superintendents administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

Recommendations for Organization—The Secretary of the Conference read the following list of recommendations for organization of the Conference. (See list.)

Motions En Bloc. Claude C. Dawdy, Secretary of the Conference, presented the following motions en bloc and on his motion they were adopted:

(1) Bar of the Conference. The Bar of the Conference shall include the main floor of the Auditorium.

(2) Roll Call. The Conference Roll shall be taken by ballot. Any member of the Conference, lay or ministerial, not present at the time of the taking of the Roll, may record his or her presence at the Conference by filing signed ballot with the Secretary. Ballots for the purpose may be obtained from the Secretary.

(3) Voting. All members of the Conference wishing to have their vote recorded by the Secretary shall be within the Bar of the Conference at the time the vote is taken, provided that nothing in the foregoing recommendation shall operate to prevent the persons serving on the Treasurer's or Statistician's Staffs from filing absentee vote.

(4) Official Program. The printed program, subject to necessary changes, shall be the Official Program of the Conference.

(5) Official Records. The Journal of Daily Proceedings as kept by the Secretary shall, upon approval by the Committee on Daily Journal, and the adoption of the Conference, and printing in the Journal and Year Book, be the Official Records of the Conference.

(6) Assistants. The assistants to the Conference Secretary, the Statistician, and the Treasurer, shall be those nominated by such Officers.

(7) Conference Reporters. For the Church Press, F. C. Stelzriede. For the Daily Press, L. A. Magill.

(8) Authorized Depositories: The First National Bank of East St. Louis, Illinois; The Citizens National Bank of Albion, Illinois; and the Security Bank of Mt. Carmel, Illinois, shall be the Authorized Depositories for the use of the Conference Treasurer for Conference funds.

(9) Change in Relation. All persons desiring a change in Conference Relation shall be referred to the Conference Relations Committee.

(10) Approved Supply Pastors. The names of all Approved Supply Pastors shall be referred to the Committee on Approved Supply Pastors.

(11) Excused. Any member of the Conference desiring to be excused from attendance upon any session or sessions of the Conference shall report his desire to his District Superintendent who, in turn, shall report the same to the Secretary for purposes of record.

(12) Organization of Boards, Committees, Commissions: All Boards, Committees, and Commissions, elected or appointed at this Conference shall, prior to the adjournment of this Conference, meet for purposes of organization and planning.

(13) Rules of Procedure. In so far as they may apply to the Conference for the transaction of its business, the General Conference Rules of Procedure shall obtain.

(14) Reference. All matters not pertaining to regular business of this Conference shall be referred to the Committee on General Reference and Procedure.

(15) Omissions. Should any omissions in the Disciplinary Questions, or oversight of other necessary matters for the completion of the work of this Conference occur, the same shall be referred to the District Superintendents and the Conference Secretary for adjustment.

(16) Committees and Conference Officer. The following Committees and Conference Officer shall be elected or appointed by this Conference, to-wit:

(a) Committee on Courtesies: F. E. Harris, Clark R. Yost, H. C. Brown, ministers; J. C. Hindman, Arthur Knapp, laymen.

- (b) Committee on Daily Journal: W. Clyde Bruce, Farrel D. Jenkins, Clyde H. Todd, ministers; C. F. Reimers, Fred G. Rauschkolb, laymen.
- (c) Committee on Agenda. E. U. Yates, Otto Horsley, C. L. Lamp, ministers; J. C. Hindman, Arthur Knapp, laymen.
- (d) Postmaster. C. B. Johnston.

(17) Motions, Reports, Resolutions, etc. All motions, reports, resolutions, memorials, and other items intended for publication in the Journal and Year Book shall be filed with the Secretary of the Conference in type-written form, double-spaced and in duplicate, at the time of their introduction or immediately following the session at which such introduction was made, by the persons making them.

(18) Announcements. All announcements to be made at the sessions of the Conference shall be handed to the Secretary for reading, such announcements, where possible, to be typewritten for purposes of accuracy.

(19) Publication of Journal. The Commission on Publishing and Ministerial Training shall be given full authority for the editing, publishing, and distributing the Journal and Year Book of 1944 session. All reports of Boards, Committees, Commissions, Councils, Trustees, Institutions, and related Organizations, intended for publication in the Journal and Year Book shall be filed with the Secretary of the Conference during this session or within ten days following adjournment of this Conference, double-spaced and in duplicate, typewritten signed by proper persons. All such reports not in the hands of the Secretary within such ten days in the prescribed form may be excluded from the 1944 Journal and Year Book.

(20) Election. This Conference shall, prior to its final adjournment, elect a Conference Secretary, Statistician, and Treasurer, whose term of office shall continue from the time of their election until the close and completion of the work of the 1945 session of this Conference.

Confirmed—The election of Claude C. Dawdy as Secretary of the Conference at its last annual session was confirmed by this Conference. He named as his assistants: O. C. Smith, Torrence A. Shaffer, A. L. Jones and Clifford C. Brown.

Conference Treasurer—On motion of F. O. Wilson, Earl W. Barrett was elected Conference Treasurer for this quadrennium.

Change in Numbered Session—On motion of N. C. Henderson, the Journal and Year Book of the Southern Illinois Conference of the Methodist Church be changed to read Ninety-third session and Sixth since union.

Introduction—Frank E. Harris introduced Dr. Byron Young of the Ministerial Association of East St. Louis. He gave an address of welcome to the Conference. Bishop Magee responded.

Adjourned—The Conference adjourned by the announcement of the 4:30 p. m. program.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF EDUCATION

To The
Session of the Annual Conference (Southern Illinois)
September 21, 1944

The first quadrennium of The Methodist Church has in its Conference Board of Education come to its close. Slowly have we ventured to interpret the program of organization for the local church, then giving further information with additional help in local churches when such has been asked of us. Some tangible growth has been observed in the adoption of the new form of organization, in the observance of the fourth Sunday in the Church Schools, recording accessions which come from the Church School the increase of Vacation Bible Schools and the increased enrollment of the membership thereof.

As to the realm of the intangible, we hope for much growth there, though no statistics can record that.

The treasurer's report showed the following statement at the pre-Conference session of the Board, August 22, 1944:

From the office, monthly letters have gone forth to the pastors giving information and instruction pertaining to the challenges which come forth from the General Board of Education. Each quarter, messages have been sent to the departmental leadership as well as the superintendents. In seasons, the Race Relations Sunday, and the Methodist Student Loan Fund have been presented. Such offerings have been increased thereby.

During March, 1944, District Planning Conferences were held attended on the average by 130 people. Splendid help was given by Miss Miller and Mr. Cunningham of the General Board.

The interests of our Educational Institutions, McKendree College, Southern Illinois Normal University with its Christian Student Center, Wesley Foundation at Urbana, Illinois Church Council clear through this office and in turn we have passed on information .

The Children's Department sent out the Children's Year Book to each leader of Children's work in the local church. Some of the teachers have enrolled in the Fellowship of Study as promotion work was done.

The Youth Division started with Booth Festival which brought in for our Conference Institutions supplies amounting to \$10,310.00, and cash of \$5,280.00, a total of \$15,590.00. An active campaign of church attendance is carried on by this division. Their Summer Institutes broke all records of attendance; Beulah with an enrollment of 1100 and over 700 at McKendree Institutes. A fine group of youth with the director attended the Convention several weeks ago at Lake Geneva.

The Adult division had planned for an Adult Institute but for various reasons, especially the inability to secure leadership, the plans for such were canceled. The local leadership has been kept informed as to the challenges of the work. We look forward to the program of the next 12 months. We recommend the adoption of it permitting changes in detail, modification or enlargement:

1. At the very start of the Conference Year 1945-46 a full-time Executive Secretary be appointed, the Conference Board of Education preparing a few months previous to the Conference session to make its selection of such an Executive Secretary.

2. We cooperate fully with the program of the CRUSADE FOR CHRIST, especially promoting larger enrollment and greater attendances in the Church and Sunday Schools.

3. We observe Rally Day October 15th, 1944, receiving an offering then for the Conference Board of Education. The amount of this offering as a minimum shall be ten cents per average attendance of people in Sunday School. Literature for the observance of Christian Education Week and Rally Day has been sent out. If possible Christian Education Week is to be observed October 8th to 15th.

4. Send to each Children's leader of local churches THE CHILDREN YEAR BOOK. To each new leader information pertaining the Fellowship of Study.

5. The Youth Division plans that Booth Festivals be held, November 6th. Midwinter institutes by groups of churches; a week of Youth evangelism in many churches, annual youth conventions in June followed by the Summer Institutes. If possible find locality, etc., where another Institute can be established. Promote "Power" devotional book, Church Attendance Club, a Watchnight Service in every charge.

6. The Adult Division will especially cooperate with the CRUSADE for CHRIST program, challenging themselves to undergird more definitely the giving to World Service. To join with the Executive Secretary in promoting the program of leadership training.

7. If possible start a Leadership Training School to be held at McKendree College sometime during the summer which includes a week-end Institute of Adults and Young Adults. This will be a cooperative adventure with the Board of Lay Activities and the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

8. Promote the interests of the Christian Student Foundation at Southern Illinois, Normal University; our churches to give financial aid if possible to its program of expansion; also to Wesley Foundation at Urbana as it presents its program to each local church; McKendree College of our own Conference demands of this Board and Conference the establishment of much better "Public Relations"; to this we pledge ourselves.

9. Promote the interests of the fourth Sunday World Service program and offering in the Sunday School.

10. The Illinois Church Council deserves our support morally and financially. Its budget asks \$1400.00 from Southern Illinois. Methodism Churches are asked to make a definite contribution to the Illinois Church Council.

THE REPORT OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

What is more needed in this modern, dazed world than the courageous proclamation of the need of repentance and salvation only by faith in the Lord Jesus Christ? Sin, faith, conversion, restitution, hell, the witness of the Holy Spirit, the baptism with the Holy Spirit, and everlasting life are doctrines that need to be preached and taught our people.

Social reforms will come when a revival of experimental religion arrives. A Christian world order will be in evidence in the wake of such a revival. The revival will start when pastors and leading laymen are soundly convinced that men are lost sinners without Christ; that they must be converted before they can enter the Kingdom of God; that the Bible is the inspired Word of God making plain the only way of salvation, and that we, as pastors and laymen need a special endowment of power from the Holy Spirit for soul winning service. We, as leaders, need to empty ourselves of selfishness, worldliness, pettiness, jealousy, strife, and pride. We need to be filled with the fruit of the spirit, spoken of by the Apostle Paul—"love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, and temperance." When all of the foregoing needs are recognized fully and acted upon similarly then Evangelism will come into its own and the Kingdom of God will be mightily advanced.

It is the express purpose of our Conference Board of Evangelism to forward a program that will attract sinners to accept our Christ, that will cause Christians to seek the lost, and that will challenge Methodist churches to sponsor evangelistic movements of many kinds, such as mass, personal, educational, clinic, industrial, and missionary. We stand ready to assist the Churches of the Conference in planning for soul winning activities.

We present the following program as a basis for our endeavors during the year 1944-45.

1. REENLIST CARELESS CHURCH MEMBERS IN OCTOBER. World Communion Sunday, October 1st will provide a wonderful opportunity to start a GO-TO-CHURCH MONTH. Enlist 10% of your members in a personal visitation campaign calling upon all members requesting their attendance each Sunday for six weeks. It will work wonders.

2. A CONFERENCE WIDE EVANGELISTIC RALLY is planned by

your Board for 2 days, November 27 and 28 at Grace Methodist Church, Salem. Outstanding speakers are being engaged. Among those who have already accepted are: Dr. Harry Denman, Executive Secretary, General Board of Evangelism; Dr. George W. Ridout, Author and Evangelist; Dr. Paul S. Rees, one of the great American pulpites; and Dr. George S. Creswell, pastor of the great Second Methodist Church, Knoxville, Tennessee. Room and breakfast over the one night has already been arranged in the homes of the members of the host church.

3. REVIVAL MEETINGS will do much to heighten the spiritual life of the Church and awaken the community to its religious obligations. If properly organized weeks before the meeting through the means of efficient committees and prayer groups there is every reason to expect a success. The key to the failure of most revivals is the lack of organization, the neglect of prayer and the wrong attitude by either the pastor or the people. When conditions are properly met a revival of blessing results.

4. THE EVANGELISTIC LECTURER FOR PASTORS SCHOOL next June will again be secured by the Conference Board of Evangelism. The Board of Ministerial Training has cooperated in a fine manner with this project in Evangelism.

5. OUR MISSIONARY EVANGELISM PROJECT started last year has caused much rejoicing among our smaller churches. Some have been reopened, some have been organized, others have had real awakenings. Rev. E. O. Allen appointed to this task last year has labored diligently conducting 18 revivals, in addition to survey work, visitation campaign, and helping reconstruct or renovate several church buildings. We recommend that our Bishop and Cabinet reappoint him as Missionary Evangelist under the direction of the Conference Board of Evangelism. In support of this great work we ask that a free will offering be received at one service in each Church to further this needy work and that \$2,000 be appropriated from our Conference Benevolences as during this year. All requests for his services shall be submitted to the Chairman of the Board of Evangelism.

6. Our THEOLOGICAL SEMINARIES are confronted with a tremendous responsibility of producing evangelistic pastors. By the direction of the Annual Conference your Board of Evangelism will be glad to contact each seminary urging them to give careful consideration to this field and if possible to establish a Chair of Evangelism in each theological school.

7. OUR CHURCH SCHOOL LITERATURE should keep the evangelistic emphasis constantly before the teacher and pupils. There is great need to have an evangelistic Bible centered curriculum in order to offset the continuing decline in Church School enrollment. Every Church School should be one of our greatest evangelistic opportunities. We recommend that the editorial division of our church school literature be requested to observe the preceding curriculum interest at all times.

8. AS APPROVED EVANGELISTS for the coming Conference year we recommend the following ministers, according to the provision of Par. 1554 of the 1944 Discipline: E. O. Hobbs, Leo Darnell, E. C. Chastain, and Garrett Phillips. We recommend that they give priority in their call for their services to the churches in the Southern Illinois Conference, and that after those calls are filled they be granted the privilege of conducting evangelistic services in other Conferences. We request that all approved evangelists live within the bounds of the Conference. Each approved evangelist shall make quarterly reports of his work to the Chairman of the Board of Evangelism.

9. MEMBERSHIP IN THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM shall consist of the district superintendents, the district evangelistic chairmen: Eugene Leckrone, C. L. Lamp, E. C. Phillips, Roland Lippman, H. E. Burge; the district lay leaders: C. T. Cramer, Burt Davis, L. N. Davenport, Arthur

Knapp, Virgil Duncan; the secretary of spiritual life of the Conference Women's Society of Christian Service, and members at large: Clyde Hindman, Farrell D. Jenkins, O. E. Connett, H. G. Hurley, C. H. Todd.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING FOR 1944

The Pastors' School and the School of Ministerial Training for the Southern Illinois Conference was held at McKendree College, Lebanon. The first week being the Pastors' School. The lecturers for the week were outstanding. Prof. Frank S. Hickman of Duke University, Dr. Arthur W. Hewitt of Northfield, Vermont, and Dr. J. B. Turbyville of Newcastle, Indiana, from the Commission on Evangelism. A larger number of pastors attended than in any previous year. Eighty-seven members of the Conference, several laymen and their wives and several wives of the ministers, beside the faculty and undergraduates.

Again we are indebted to Dr. Wm. K. Anderson, Secretary of the Commission on the Courses of Study, for his interest in our school and his great help in securing lecturers of prominence and ability. The Commission also gave generous financial assistance.

It is the desire of our Board that our school have a deep spiritual undertone as well as a scholastic atmosphere. There were nineteen Undergraduates, twenty-two Accepted Supplies and three Local Preachers.

We are indebted to Dr. C. R. Yost, President of McKendree College and his staff for the splendid entertainment of the Pastors' School for the loyalty of the Conference, faculty and student body I am most grateful. The date for the Pastors' School for 1945 will be June 18. Plan to be there.

SUBJECT: ANNUAL CONFERENCE REPORT

TO: SECRETARY SOUTHERN ILLINOIS ANNUAL CONFERENCE

CHRISTIAN CITIZENSHIP COMMISSION

Christian Citizenship is no doubt the outstanding accomplishment of our civilization. To detract from it or weaken its foundations would be disastrous to the future generation. To live up to its standards and christian ideals is to enrich and beautify all of life. Everything of value must have leaders. What would be the condition of christianity without the christian ministry? Who is better fitted to build the christian citizenship of the future in our country than he; in my opinion, no one. Then upon him rests a major responsibility in this important enterprise.

For this reason he should have the following qualifications:

1. He should have a direct acquaintance with God and His Holy Word.
2. He should have an education comparable with the leaders in the teaching profession of our public schools.
3. He should have a deep interest in the highest welfare of public life and carry the conviction that all who do not know God will be eternally lost.
4. He should be deeply conscious of the fact that wasted time is wasted opportunity, and no greater opportunity comes to any one than the preaching of the Word of God from the pulpit, which in reality is the turning of the light of divine truth upon the darkness of an indifferent and sinful world.

God always has a message for His servants if they work hard, and long, and prayerful for it. Some of his most faithful servants often put an hour

of preparation for every minute of delivery. God always blesses such work when done for His glory and the building of His kingdom. How can any man even pray to God for help until he has already done his best.

We believe that the above program and principles to be the basis for the building of true Christian citizenship. No organization is better equipped to carry out this program than the church of Jesus Christ. It teaches that Christ's way of life is the only perfect way and it seeks to exalt Him who said, "And I, if I be lifted up will draw all men unto me."

Next to the ministry in this great enterprise is the great staff of Church School teachers who are charged with the responsibility of teaching the children and 'teen age groups in their formative years the principles of christian living. If this opportunity is lost or wasted it may never be redeemed.

May we not say that the sum total of christian citizenship is to be found in a sane program of evangelism in all of its fullness which will lead men into the love of God to the extent that they will make christianity practical in every human relationship.

REQUIREMENTS OF MINISTERS AND CHARGES FOR THE SCHOOL OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND PUBLISHING FUND COMMISSION

To finance the publication of the Conference Journal and the expansion of the School of Ministerial Training for the year 1945 the following rules will be observed:

1. Each pastor (conference member or supply) is ordered to raise a sum equal to 1% of his cash salary for the annual Conference Administration Fund, and remit to E. W. Barrett, Conference Treasurer, by May 25, 1945. Each District Superintendent and member in special appointment is ordered to pay a sum equal to \$.20 for each \$100 of his cash salary.

2. Any person coming under the rules and failing to act in harmony with the same shall on the third day of the 1945 session of the Conference be referred to the District Superintendent by the Treasurer of the Commission.

3. Journals will be distributed on the basis of one copy to each \$200 in salary and will be sent prepaid to the pastor of each CHARGE.

4. Ministers in special appointments will be given three copies for each dollar paid to the Treasurer of the Commission. Also all members of the Conference now serving in the armed forces will be given one copy free.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE

It has been our duty and privilege to attempt to embody, in words suitable to our day, the lifelong position, of the Church called Methodist, in regard to the liquor traffic.

We are very proud to thus serve a group of eight millions of people who have behind them a fine record in this matter.

We wish to state without equivocation, mental reservations, or any secret evasion of mind whatever persons opposed to the legalized sale of liquor are not crack-pots neither are they the champions of a lost cause.

We deplore the fact that beer and liquors are made so easily available to our boys in the armed services.

We furthermore deplore the participation of members of our Church in such events as cocktail parties or other social functions where liquor is served and call upon every member of our Church to practice total abstinence.

We declare that each Governmental Department in our state or nation which receives revenue from tax on the sales of liquor is in some measure polluted thereby.

We are convinced that the legalized sale of liquor can never be justified in any nation under Heaven, particularly an enlightened nation such as our own.

If there be any cowardice among law enforcement officers which causes them to favor violations of law by those who sell liquor we hasten to remind

them that the stench which arises from cowardice in such matters is as offensive to the moral sense as any unpleasant odor can be to the olfactory sense.

We recommend that the several State Legislatures and, particularly our own, pass regulatory laws governing the sale of liquor which make it unlawful for the keeper of a tavern to put a drunken person out anywhere except the front door and make the man who sold the last drink to any person who may be fined for drunkenness and disorderliness, automatically liable to fine in the same amount as the customer.

We recommend that the ministers and laity of each community cooperate with Womans Christian Temperance Union or any other organization of dry forces which may work there.

Thanks be unto God, our Heavenly Father, who hath loved us and redeemed us through His Only Begotten Son, the Lord, Jesus Christ, and hath lifted us up into fellowship and co-partnership with Him in world redemption and hath called us to the high rank of the ministry of the gospel of Christ in the great Methodist Church, raised up of God to spread scriptural Holiness throughout the Land.

We are truly grateful that the Jurisdictional Conference of the North Central Jurisdiction, meeting in Minneapolis, assigned to the Chicago area Bishop J. Ralph Magee, a tireless, aggressive and incomparable spiritual

leader of The Methodist Church. Bishop Magee, we welcome you to our Conference and pledge you here and now our whole-hearted support as you lead the Methodist hosts of the Chicago area.

Since our last annual Conference, 5 of our brethren in the ministry, 1 minister's wife and 4 widows of ministers have departed this life. OUR UNITED METHODISM

We have just closed the first quadrennium of our united Methodism known as The Methodist Church. In the Episcopal address given at the General Conference in Kansas City, our attention was called to the significant years in three centuries. The forty-fourth year in each of the last three centuries has played a decisive role in Methodism's history.

In June, 1744, the first Methodist Conference convened in the Foundry in London, under the presidency of John Wesley. The conference was composed of ten men. Six were clergymen and four were lay preachers.

The general Conference of 1844 marked the division of the Methodist Episcopal Church into the Northern and Southern groups.

The General Conference of 1944 finds us all at home in the house of our Father's one great United Methodism, with undivided energy and un-wasted resources, ready and eager to deliver her full strength upon a divided and sinning world.

ACHIEVEMENTS

In spite of the fact that the past year found us in the midst of one of the bloodiest struggles the world has ever known and the people of America were called upon for an all-out program of war, which necessitated the spending of not only millions, but billions, of dollars, the people called Methodists have endeavored to do their share in providing young men and young women for the armed services, and to carry their part of the load financially. They have, also, not neglected the Church and the Kingdom's interests. The Conference has spent for buildings and improvements the sum of \$191,110.00 and has paid indebtedness to the amount of \$42,274.

The report of the Conference Treasurer will show this one of our best years in World Service giving. The Southern Illinois Conference has given to World Service an apportionment of \$68,693, an increase of \$11,558 over last year, and to special gifts \$20,344, an increase over last year of \$1,436. Throughout the Conference there has been a 20% increase in World Service giving, and in many of our churches from ten to one hundred per cent increase in giving.

Christianity was intended to be, and of necessity is, a missionary religion. To take away its world view, to steal away its missionary passion is to rob it of its character and leave it something other than its true self. A Missionary Church is a live church and a growing church, a prosperous church. The philosophy of Jesus is eternally true, "Whoso seeks to save his life shall lose it, but whoso loses his life for my sake shall find it again." "Give and it shall be given unto you, a good measure pressed down, shaken together and running over." Ours is a world task and a world responsibility, and we dare not neglect it. Give to our people the inspiration they need, and let them see their responsibility and they will respond.

In the coming year let us make more of fourth Sunday World Service offerings, and wonders can be performed, even in our smallest churches.

To our Conference Institutions under the unified budget there has been given \$47,461.00.

Two unusual Youth Institutes were held this year with record attendance. At McKendree there were approximately 700 registrations and at Eldorado there were 1130 registered. This is remarkable when we consider so many of our youth are in the armed service or engaged in war work. Splendid work was done in the classes and hundreds of young people responded to the call of Christ in the evening service.

This has not been a futile year in the way of conversions and accessions. Statistics will show that there have been a goodly number converted and 2,281 received on profession of faith. For these results, we are truly grateful, but are humbly aware that the results are tremendously below what they should be.

The minutes of 1943 revealed that with 527 churches in this Conference, 238 of these churches report no accessions on profession of faith. Brethren, this is enough to drive the last one of us to an altar of prayer in humble confession of our sin, of negligence and indifference. Truly, this is enough to make weeping prophets and heart-broken apostles of us all! Certainly our many alibis will not justify so deplorable a situation. A Conference with our evangelistic tradition should be able to win more members to Christ and His Church. Certainly, it brings a demand for heart searching and better planning. Statistics revealed that it took 34 members to win one member to Christ. It also reveals that not one-tenth of our members are attending the mid-week prayer meetings. Surely there is something wrong with our program of evangelism. Two things seem to be indicated. Too much revival froth and visitation campaign frost. Certainly we need to begin to take seriously our supreme task, which is to save souls. We must keep faith with our Fathers; keep faith with our children; and above all, we must keep faith with Christ. Our Bishops in the 1944 Episcopal address state "that Methodism's great need is a wise and winsome evangelism. The gospel must be preached with confidence and with passion. We must tell men that while they inherit the infirmities and sins of the race, they also, inherit the salvation which Christ offers all mankind. We must tell them that they live, not in a lost world but in a redeemed world, and that when man accepts his true relation with Christ, he lives under a new Heaven and on a new earth. The one thing that stirred the early Methodists and sent them forth as fire brands with a contagious joy was that God in Christ had come to the rescue of sinful humanity. They witnessed everywhere because they had found Christ as the Saviour from sin, the creator of new character and the giver of everlasting life. With warm hearts and eager spirits, they went everywhere to bring men into a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ."

The divine urge which characterized our Fathers must possess us. They burned to win men to Christ. There are usually as many anxious sinners to receive Christ as there are anxious people to see them saved. The crying need of the modern church, and the modern pulpit, is a soul-passion; a passion that will not be satisfied with less than the salvation of the souls of men.

The Episcopal Address also said, "Surely, by this time we have discovered that soft sayings about virtue, the evolution of the race, and the inherent goodness of mankind will not produce the evangelism the world sorely needs. We must speak again of the ghastly reality of sin; of the atonement of Christ; of justification by Faith; of the eternal profit of goodness and of the everlasting loss to those who will not have Christ. This generation, like all others, must come to see that sin is the gulf which

separates man from God and must learn that Christ, by dying on the Cross, did something for man which he could not do for himself."

Our Evangelism must be of a nature which stirs the conscience, influences the will and brings men to believe in Christ, who alone is able to change the heart and renew the life. What would happen if 78,000 Methodist laymen and 250 Methodist preachers fire-baptized and with a holy urge in their souls would go forth in town and cities and throughout the countryside witnessing for Jesus? There would not be a church in which there are reported no professions of faith. The lax morality and cold indifference that characterizes so many communities would melt away. The movies, the tobacco companies and the liquor interest would note a decidedly large decrease in their iniquitous business. The Sunday School, the mid-week prayer meeting and the Sunday evening services would show a tremendous increase in attendance and interest and Southern Illinois would be ablaze with revival fire that characterized our early Methodists.

THE DAYS THAT ARE AHEAD

We are sure the Methodists of the Southern Illinois Conference wish to Forward March! Never did we have better equipped churches, more trained ministers, and greater facilities for the training of ministers and a more highly organized program, guided by more wisely and competent leadership in the general church.

The Conference Board of Education has made its plans for a more thorough and aggressive program of Christian education. It is the plan to place in the field of Religious Education a full time, paid executive secretary, beginning the Fall of 1945. This is a pressing need of all our churches, both rural and city. It is amazing that we are able to accomplish as much as we are with so poorly trained leadership and inadequate equipment. This can be done. It can be done by each church faithfully observing Rally Day and a generous offering being taken in every church on that day. The report this year will show an increase in the Rally Day giving, but we have not touched the rim in the possibilities of this day.

Under the program of Christian Education we wish to say a word about McKendress College that has stood so many years preparing young men and women for life's work and sending them forth into many parts of the world. We need a greater and better McKendree with the united support of every preacher and every laymen in Southern Illinois. There is no institution in the Conference so greatly needed as this College. And no greater possibilities and opportunities are offered to any institution.

In order to the success of any cause, or enterprise, good or evil, it seems that some center of influence and radiation must exist. Let that cause be educational, religious, or of business and political character, there must be a center, a base of counsel and operation where the tribes come and the workers can gather for the renewing of their faith and zeal, and from which they can go out to carry forward their enterprise, the inculcation of their views, the spread of their educational efforts, and the propaganda of their religious principles, missionary and evangelistic program. This is true of great business enterprises; it is true of great political parties; it is equally true of great religious movements.

God made Jerusalem a world center of religious influence. While kings and priests and prophets were devout and true, Jerusalem was a powerful magnet that drew together the tribes of Israel and in time the ends of the earth. Representatives of pagan nations came to look upon the magnificence of the temple, to listen to the wisdom of the kings, the instruction of the priests and the proclamation of the prophets. When the kings backslid and priests became selfish and false prophets proclaimed smooth and easy things, the holy fires went out; Jerusalem plunged into sin, and directly the torch of the enemy was applied, and the Holy City was wrapped

in red flames. Desolation and ashes marked the place where a great center of influence had been destroyed, and God's back-slidden people were carried into captivity and became wanderers on the face of the earth.

One of the secrets of the tremendous influence and power of Roman Catholicism is the Vatican in the City of Rome. Countless millions of Catholic people will come to Rome from the ends of the earth and carry away with them a fresh inspiration of faith and purpose. While Rome stands, Roman Catholicism will abide and spread in the earth.

One of the secrets of the growth and prosperity of Mormonism is found in her center of influence at Salt Lake City. Thousands of tourists are awed by her architecture, charmed by her music, and influenced by the teachings of the wisest and strongest men of this strange cult. Mormonism never could have been what it is, and could not continue to be what it is, but for the tremendous center of influence at Salt Lake City.

Man is so constituted that to give of his substance, to gird himself with power, to kindle his zeal for effort, to consecrate himself to any great enterprise whatsoever he must have a center toward which he looks, a place dear to his heart. This place must so associate itself with his beliefs, his convictions and his efforts to propagate his views that he finds encouragement to visit the place, or to make it sacred in his memory and in his thought.

So every Conference needs a great spiritual center of influence and power radiating out to its churches and pulpits, into its missionary fields and to the life of its communities. Centers where character is builded, minds are trained, souls are inspired, and life is endowed with a mighty power that will make it a living force for truth and righteousness. Such a center is altogether possible at McKendree, situated in Southern Illinois where hundreds of our finest youth are assembled in Youth Institutes every summer. Such a center will attract hundreds of our youth, and will bring in thousands of dollars for its support.

The Annual Conference commission on evangelism last year recommended the placing of a missionary evangelist in the field to work in defense areas and rural churches, and to reopen closed churches. The recommendation was voted by the Conference, and the appointment was made by the Bishop and the Cabinet. In the first year of this experiment, it has proven to be profitable, and we trust it will be continued as a Conference project in the field of evangelism for this next year.

One of our most neglected fields is that of our rural churches, and one of our most fertile fields is in the rural communities. The people are there, and many of them ready to be challenged, and are waiting for someone who has an interest in souls to visit them and to invite them.

In Paul's farewell message to the Ephesian elders, he declared that he had taught them "publicly, from house to house." This statement throws a flood of light upon the method of evangelism used in the Church in the first century.

There was mass evangelism, educational evangelism and visitation evangelism. All of these methods were regarded as essential and as complementary, each to the other. Placing special emphasis upon any one of these methods should not be to the discredit or to the neglect of the others. Jesus stands as the supreme example in all three methods. He preached to the masses who listened eagerly to His wonderful word. He was the great Teacher, instructing the people in the Way of Life. He searched out the individuals, one by one, and called them to be His disciples. Levi was sitting at the receipt of customs when the Master called him. The conversation of Jesus with the Samaritan woman at the well resulted in her conversion.

We must use all methods of evangelism. The method of evangelism is not so important as it is that we have Evangelism that evangelizes. And the Evangelism that evangelizes is that kind that is aflame with passionate desire and expectancy. Not all can preach to the masses; not all have the gift of teaching, but all may witness for Christ as individuals.

A Christian witness is one who knows and burns to tell it. It is the privilege and responsibility of every Christian to bear witness to others concerning Jesus Christ and His saving power. This witness for Christ may be given to people wherever we find them, whether at home, on the highways, at the place of business, or elsewhere.

A significant phase of the great revival of Pentecost was the witnessing of 120 to the people upon the streets at Jerusalem.

Following their baptism with the Holy Ghost, they left the upper room and went to the streets of the city to give testimony to the people whom they met, concerning Christ and His great redemption. The personal witness of the 120 disciples furnished the background for Peter's sermon. It was not Peter's sermon alone which resulted in 3,000 conversions on the day of Pentecost. It was the sermon and the personal witnessing of the disciples in the power of the Holy Ghost that produced the remarkable results.

We have depended too much on mechanics and too little on dynamics in days gone by. The great need of the modern church is a witnessing people. Both preacher and laymen whose hearts are aflame with a passion for souls and whose lives are imbued with the fire of Pentecost, and like Samson's foxes, turned loose upon a world that is ripe unto harvest.

If every pastor in every church will take seriously this business of evangelism, and by methods of revivals, personal visitation and educational evangelism, we can have the most fruitful harvest of souls and accessions to the church we have ever experienced.

The Board of Lay Activities is one of the most resourceful agencies in the church to do this task.

Let every pastor see to it that the program of lay activities is properly organized in every church, and let every charge, lay leader, and church lay leader take seriously his task and the whole program of the church will be done.

Again on Sunday, October 1, will our Methodist Churches be asked to observe World Communion Sunday. This is a lovely custom practiced in Methodism since 1941. It is known as the Fellowship of Suffering, and no better place can it be observed, than at the Lord's Table, where in the spirit of the Master an offering of love and compassion is made for members of the world wide fellowship who need our ministry. We urge every church to make much of this day.

Lastly, as we face the days ahead, we are confronted and challenged by the CRUSADE FOR CHRIST. The greatness of the church must ever be measured by her response to the mind of God, and her sensitiveness to human need. If either of these be lost from her life and work, then her glory has departed.

The General Conference of 1944 was a significant and critical meeting for the future of The Methodist Church. Unification had become an established fact. We had announced to the world the size and influence of our constituency, and such announcement was not always tempered with becoming humility. Our Boards and agencies had been organized and tested. The machinery of a great Church had been compactly put together and we had looked upon it and said that it was good. The one question to be answered was "What would the Methodist attempt to do with a fellowship

and organization of eight million souls, all of whom, by the token of their membership in the Church, acknowledged Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour?" Would a united and potential Methodism settle down to a comfortable and parochial existence? Would it use its vast resources chiefly to perpetuate itself and to extend its ecclesiastical borders? Or, would the Methodist Church prove itself to be, in reality, a part of the body of Christ, the dwelling place of the Spirit, the instrument through which His love finds expression and His work is continued in the world? How would the church invest its powers and face its opportunities? The answer to these questions was written into the record of the 1944 General Conference. The delegated legislative body of men and women who assembled, seriously faced their task. Being aware of the unprecedented opportunities and responsibilities of the church in this wartorn and broken world, their answer for the Methodist Church was A CRUSADE FOR CHRIST, or five great adventures for the Church of Christ. For almost a year a Committee of twenty-one, appointed by the Council of Bishops and the Commission on World Service and Finance, in cooperation with the Board Secretaries and their assistants, studied in detail the world-wide ministry of the Methodist Church and the program that should now be enterprised.

This careful and prayerful study gave birth to the CRUSADE FOR CHRIST which is the challenge for a Methodist advance along five avenues vital to the Church's life.

This is a quadriennial objective with five major interests. 1. New World Order. 2. Methodist Relief and Reconstruction. 3. Church-wide Evangelism. 4. Church-wide Stewardship. 5. Building Church School Enrollment.

The New World Order led by the Bishops of the Church has already made a notable contribution toward defining the principles of a just and enduring peace.

Rehabilitation and Church Extension, forces itself upon us in an era such as the present, and demands immediate and decisive steps to be taken to re-establish, as soon as possible, our work in the war-devastated areas of the world. A minimum of twenty-five million dollars is required if the Methodist Church in this quadriennium is to project a program of rehabilitation and extension in any sense commensurate with the opportunity and need. The actual need would call for more than one hundred million dollars. This twenty-five million is to be raised during the first half of 1945, in cash or pledges, to be payable not later than January 31, 1946.

Someone says, "It can't be done."

The national income of 1943, according to federal statistics, was one hundred and forty-three billion dollars, or a billion dollars for a little over every one million population.

The Methodists are average citizens. Eight million Methodists would have an income of eight billion dollars, the tithe of which is eight hundred million dollars. We paid for all purposes in that year a little over ninety-four million dollars, which means we kept back over seven hundred million dollars that rightfully belongs to God and His Kingdom.

Yes! If all Methodists will take Jesus Christ seriously, it can be done.

Then the years of 1946, 1947, and 1948 will be given to evangelism, stewardship and building of church school enrollment.

Bishop Magee, the Southern Illinois Conference can be depended upon for this great program. We pledge you our whole-hearted faith and support.

Brethren, our task as disciples of Jesus and as messengers sent forth

is the greatest task that can possibly employ intelligent beings. Angels covet our position.

May we give ourselves to the task with all our souls. May we have wisdom that comes down from above; the redemption that comes by faith in the Cleansing Blood, and the Power that is conferred by the baptism of the Holy Ghost, that we may go forth triumphantly and labor successfully in this glorious mission to which we have been called. Amen! Amen!

Abandoned churches have been reorganized, limping churches have taken off their crutches to walk again, delapidated edifices have been remodeled into worshipful sanctuaries, and virgin fields have been organized into new congregations. God has seen some of his erring children come home by the way of the new birth. His lukewarm children have been revived and his converted children have received the spiritual baptism. All of this because the Southern Illinois Conference answered the call of human need and sent an ambassador to represent the claims of Christ to these who had become discouraged in the smaller churches.

One lady wrote that she had lived in her community for years and that this was the first time her rural church had the privilege of outside talent to conduct a series of evangelistic services. Not because they did not need and want someone, but because they could not afford to pay the proper honorarium.

REPORT HOLDEN HOSPITAL CORPORATION

September 7, 1944

The Annual meeting of the Board of Directors of Holden Hospital Corporation was held September 7, 1944, at the hospital at 10:00 A. M. with Dr. G. E. Whitten, president, in charge.

Those present were: Rev. E. U. Yates, Rev. V. W. Corrie, Mr. F. M. Hewitt, Mr. J. D. Dill, Dr. C. C. Hall, Mr. Thomas W. Martin, Mr. C. T. Houghton, Rev. Paul Brown, Dr. M. S. Harvey, Mr. J. E. Etherton, Mrs. A. C. Richardson, Mrs. J. D. Dill, Mrs. Purcell, Mrs. Elmer Davis, Mrs. Maude Daniels, Mrs. W. B. McGinnis, Mrs. S. S. Ritchey, Mrs. Mark Woodley and Aline Van Natta.

The meeting was opened by a few timely remarks by Dr. G. E. Whitten, president of the Board. He recalled his experience when approaching the site of the Inn while passing along the road between Jericho and the Dead Sea. He was reminded of the story of the Good Samaritan while standing at the site of the Inn. He compared our own Holden Hospital to the Good Samaritan in its work of ministering to the sick and needy of our own community. Following his remarks he called on Dr. C. C. Hall, Chaplain and Executive Secretary of Holden Hospital, to pray.

The minutes of the Annual Board Meeting of September 2, 1943 were read and approved.

A letter was read from Dr. Clark R. Yost of Lebanon, Illinois, stating that he would be unable to attend the meeting but his thoughts and best wishes would be with the Board. He enclosed a check for \$10.00 which was turned over to Dr. C. C. Hall. The Secretary was instructed to write Dr. Yost and thank him for his gift and best wishes for Holden Hospital.

Under unfinished business the indebtedness of Holden Hospital was discussed.

Dr. G. E. Whitten explained that Dr. Hall worked out a plan whereby the indebtedness could be liquidated in one year if each person in the Conference would give 70c for Holden Hospital. He told of a dinner which was held July 20, 1944 in honor of Bishop J. Ralph Magee at the hospital. He explained that Bishop Magee suggested that 70c per member for Holden Hospital be added to the Crusade for Christ movement and the hospital would get its pro-rata from the moneys collected. Since that time, Bishop Magee informed Dr. Whitten that it would be impossible to add the asking of the hospital to the Crusade for Christ movement.

Rev. Brown suggested that Bishop Magee had evidently run into objections to the plan in the general church.

Dr. Hall stated he had a letter from Bishop Magee confirming the statements which he had made at the dinner July 20, 1944, but that it was perfectly evident that he had changed his mind and the Holden Hospital cause could not be added to the Crusade for Christ movement. Dr. Hall spoke very highly of the movement and said it was needed by the world and it would be done by the Methodist Church.

Dr. Hall stated that Holden Hospital belongs to the W. S. C. S. and the Southern Illinois Conference and it is the only Protestant hospital south of Alton in Illinois. It is well located and needed. He stated that the Conference and the W. S. C. S. should get their eyes open to the needs of Holden Hospital and our task as a Board is to get the needs over to the people of our Conference.

Before any definite plans could be made, it was suggested by Rev. Brown that we have the annual reports of the Superintendent and the treasurer of Holden Hospital Corporation.

Miss Mattie B. Pangburn, Superintendent of Holden Hospital, gave a most excellent report covering her work for the year ending August 24, 1944.

A motion was made by Dr. Hall and seconded by Rev. Yates that Miss Pangburn be congratulated on her fine report and that it be accepted and placed on file. Motion carried.

In the absence of Mr. Charles E. Dill, Treasurer of Holden Hospital Corporation, the annual report was read by the Secretary and ordered placed on file.

It was called to our attention by the President, Dr. Whitten, that \$23,000.00 had been paid on the Holden Hospital indebtedness in the past three years.

Rev. Brown suggested that the Crusade for Christ movement would be over January 1, 1946; then a drive for Holden Hospital could be made throughout the Conference.

Rev. Yates stated that as members of the Board of Directors for Holden Hospital Corporation, we are for the Crusade for Christ, but that we should get a part of the indebtedness of Holden Hospital raised before the Crusade starts January 1, 1945.

A motion was made by Rev. Yates and seconded by Mrs. Daniels that

a committee be appointed to formulate plans and report at the afternoon session. Motion carried.

Dr. Whitten appointed a committee composed of Rev. Yates, Mrs. Davis, Mr. Houghten, Mr. Martin, Rev. Brown, Mr. Dill and Dr. Hall.

A portion of a letter was read from Bishop Magee in which he stated that a meeting would be held in Chicago, September 12, 1944 in his offices from 10:00 to 5:00 at which time the Crusade for Christ would be explained to the District Superintendents and leaders of the Church.

The following committees were appointed by Dr. Whitten:

BUILDING: Mrs. Ritchey, Mrs. Mitchell, Mrs. Richardson, Mrs. Woodley, Mrs. Purcell.

NOMINATING: Mrs. McGinnis, Mrs. Daniels, Rev. Corrie.

Mrs. McGinnis urged the women present to bring pressure on the president of the Conference and see that she gives Dr. Hall more time for presenting the cause of Holden Hospital at all the District meetings.

The morning session was closed by silent prayer, after which, all joined in repeating the Lord's prayer.

A most delicious and sumptuous luncheon was served to those present by Miss Pangburn and her fine corps of workers. A vote of thanks was extended to the hospital staff for its gracious hospitality.

The afternoon session of the annual meeting of the Board of Directors of Holden Hospital Corporation was called together promptly at 2:00 o'clock.

The report of the Finance Committee was given by the chairman, Rev. E. U. Yates. They recommended:

1. That prospective lists of donors be sent to Holden Hospital by the ministers and laymen.
2. A Committee composed of the following people should work with Dr. Hall and see the proper people: Mr. Martin, Mr. Dill, Mr. Houghten, Dr. Harvey, Dr. Whitten and Rev. Brown.
3. That a duplicate card be sent to each minister of the Conference asking him to give prospective donors. Dr. Hall to make presentation at conference and W. S. C. S. District meetings.

A motion was made by Rev. Yates, and seconded by Mr. Dill that the report of the Finance Committee be accepted and placed on file. Motion carried.

The report of the Building Committee was given by the Chairman, Mrs. Ritchey.

She stated that it was a pleasure to inspect the building as it was so clean and in such fine shape.

They recommended:

1. That linoleum be placed on the lower floor and the first floor.
2. That we get rid of the old building as soon as possible and build a new wing.

A motion was made by Rev. Yates and seconded by Mr. Dill that the report of the Building committee be accepted and placed on file. Motion carried.

The report of the Nominating Committee was made by the Chairman,

Mrs. McGinnis. She stated that the Class of 1947 from the W. S. C. S. consisting of Mrs. O. E. Connett, Flora, Illinois; Mrs. J. D. Dill, of Carbondale, Illinois, and Mrs. Fred Nave of Carbondale, Illinois, had been elected at the May meeting. A motion was made by Mrs. McGinnis and seconded by Mr. Dill that the names as presented by the W. S. C. S. be confirmed by the Board of Directors. Motion carried.

The Nominating Committee submitted the names of Rev. E. U. Yates of Centralia, Illinois; Rev. V. W. Corrie of Herrin, Illinois; Dr. C. R. Yost of Lebanon, Illinois and Mr. F. M. Hewitt of Carbondale, Illinois for the class of 1947. A motion was made by Mrs. McGinnis and seconded by Rev. Yates that the report be accepted and placed on file. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Rev. Yates and seconded by Mr. Dill that Dr. Hall and the Secretary see that the minutes of the meeting be sent to the proper authorities. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Dr. Harvey and seconded by Mr. Dill that Dr. C. R. Yost be elected by the Conference as the member of the Board of Trustees to serve on the Holden Hospital Board of Directors. Motion carried.

Mr. Dill spoke to the Board of the work of Mrs. Adella Mitchell, of Evanston, Illinois, vice-president emeritus of the Holden Hospital Board of Directors. He stated that Mrs. Mitchell and Mrs. Hermon Moss were responsible for the organization of Holden hospital. He said that Mrs. Mitchell is the wife of the late Dr. H. C. Mitchell, the most noted surgeon Southern Illinois has ever known. He stated that Mrs. Mitchell had written a history of Holden Hospital.

A motion was made by Rev. Yates and seconded by Mr. Houghten that a copy of the history of Holden Hospital be mimeographed for each Board Member and if the Executive Committee sees fit, to have the history printed and placed in the hands of all the W. S. C. S. members of the District. Motion carried.

Mrs. Mitchell was presented by Mr. Dill and in her most gracious manner thanked Mr. Dill for his kind remarks and briefly told of her History of Holden Hospital.

A motion was made by Mr. Dill and seconded by Rev. Brown that we adjourn. Motion carried.

The meeting was closed by a prayer by Rev. Corrie.

SCHEDULE "A"

General Statement

The account books and records of the Methodist Old Folks' Home, located at Lawrenceville, Illinois, were found to be kept in a neat, orderly and satisfactory manner. The Superintendent is to be commended for his work in this connection.

Receipts

Receipts, as entered on the "Cash Receipts" book by the Superintendent, were traced through their transmittal to the Treasurer and subsequent deposit by him. All receipts shown in the "Cash Receipts" book were deposited with the exception of \$463.34, which was transmitted to the Treasurer on August 31, 1944. Examination of subsequent bank statement shows deposit of this amount on September 9, 1944. This amount is listed in the financial report of this audit as "Funds in hands of Treasurer."

Disbursements

Disbursements are made by check from invoices received. These invoices are approved for payment by the Superintendent. The checks are executed by him and presented, with voucher, to the Treasurer for countersignature. Total disbursements as shown by the "Cash Disbursements" book were found to agree with bank statement totals of cancelled checks, except as otherwise noted in this report. Test checks were made against individual disbursements and cancelled checks, but no attempt was made to trace each individual transaction. The "Cash Disbursements" book is columned for Voucher number, name of payee, amount, classification, etc.

Cash Accounts

The depository for the institution's general fund, or checking account, is the Farmer's State Bank of Lawrenceville, Illinois. Receipts are deposited and checks drawn for disbursements. The bank account was reconciled as of August 31, 1944, and checks outstanding as of that date were found to have cleared at the date of the audit (September 16, 1944), except as noted in the list of checks outstanding August 31, as shown in Schedule "C."

In addition to the general checking account, two savings accounts are maintained, one in the Peoples' State Bank and the other in the Farmers' State Bank, both located at Lawrenceville, Illinois. The savings account with the Peoples' State Bank has not been credited with accrued interest since November 1, 1943. The savings account with the Farmers' State Bank has had no interest credit entered since January 12, 1944. It is suggested that both accounts be taken to the depository for interest credit entry. These savings accounts were not verified with the depositories, but the pass books were examined.

On May 9, 1944, a check in the amount of \$61.14 was drawn by the Superintendent to close a joint account into the general checking account. The joint account had been deposited in the Farmers' State Bank in the names of the Methodist Old Folks' Home and/or a Mrs. Reef, an inmate. Upon the demise of Mrs. Reef, it was desired to transfer the balance of the account, \$61.14, to the general fund. Through error, the check was treated as both a deposit and withdrawal on the bank's statement of the general fund account. This was not verified with the bank, but the amount is shown on the statement of Cash Balance in this report as "Mrs. Reef Joint Account."

In the 1943 report, an account with the Lawrenceville Savings and Loan Association is carried as a cash balance, in the amount of \$5,000.00. In order not to disturb this arrangement, the report of Cash Balance, accompanying this audit report, continues this practice. However, it is believed that this investment should, in the future, be treated as a security rather than a cash account.

It has not been the accounting practice of either the Superintendent or the Treasurer to show a cash balance and bank reconciliation each month. In the interest of accepted accounting procedure, it is respectfully suggested that the practice of monthly reconciliation of the general fund be adopted.

Securities

All securities listed in the "Securities Record" book are deposited in a safety deposit box at the Farmers' State Bank. These securities were found to be intact, as represented. They were examined and amounts and descriptions were verified.

According to the records of the institution, securities in the amount of \$10,138.00 were acquired as membership fees during this fiscal year. These are not listed with the cash membership fees on the attached report of receipts.

84 shares of A. E. Staley preferred stock, cost \$9,072.00, were informally valued at \$105.00 per share, total \$8,820.00, by Mr. S. R. Nye, Cashier of the Farmers' State Bank. 52 shares of American Telephone and Telegraph common stock, cost \$8,138.00, were carried in regular newspaper stock market quotations on September 16, 1944, at a low of \$160.50 per share, total \$8,346.00.

It is noted that Series "F" appreciation bonds are carried on the "Securities Record" at cost. It is believed that provision should be made on the records for showing enhanced cash-in value.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT ORPHANS' AND CHILDREN'S HOME

Mr. President and members of the Board of Managers of the Orphans' and Children's Home of the Southern Illinois Conference of The Methodist Church, I bring you greetings from our (rather) large family, coming to you with my fifth Annual Report as Superintendent; thankful to God for the manifold rich blessings with which He has blessed the children and the workers during the year just closed. We rejoice in the fact that God has surely led and blessed so richly all the efforts connected with the Orphans' and Children's Home and the task to which this institution is dedicated by the Southern Illinois Conference in this particular phase of the Kingdom of our God. My thanks and my gratitude includes, the staff of workers, the

Board of Managers, every church of the Southern Illinois Conference, contributing friends, and all who have the welfare of needy and dependent children upon their hearts and in their prayers.

We have carried practically our maximum load (numerically) throughout the entire year, and our heart grieved many times because of the number of needy and deserving children we were compelled to turn away through the lack of room and workers to care for them.

Because of gas and tire rationing, our ability to contact and speak in churches has been greatly limited this year as well as last; and we have tried to conserve along this line, that we might be able to make necessary contacts for case study, court cases, placements, rehabilitation of homes, etc.

God has blessed in a most remarkable way in making it possible for us to maintain the excellent health record of the previous four years, which is a national record, our being the only Home reporting in the National Convention of Hospital and Homes Board at Indianapolis, Indiana, last February, for five consecutive years, during which time not a case of food-poisoning, pneumonia, serious accident, nor a death from any cause among the children or workers. We have had an average population of seventy-five people, counting those of the Administration, and there has not been a professional call by any physician at the Home this year, and only six such calls in the five years immediately past.

Financially: The Home, through the Unified Financial Plan of the Conference, received from the churches, on Apportionment approximately \$2500.00 more than last year, which makes it about \$2500.00 less on apportionment than we received two years ago under the old plan; but the designated gifts were approximately \$1000.00 more from the churches and from individuals asking that their churches receive credit for such gifts than last year.

Physically: The Home is in the best physical and financial condition of its history, and, I sincerely trust, the moral and spiritual condition is equally good. We have borrowed no money during the year, and all bills and expenses have been met regularly every thirty days. Barring unforeseen tragedy such as fire, cyclone, etc., with God's continued blessings, the Home will be able to close the calendar year of 1944 without borrowing money, or having any unpaid accounts, duplicating the record of the last four years.

We have tried most scrupulously, at all times, to account for, and use as a sacred and divine trust, every penny coming to us for the work of the Home; our motto being: "Breakage is waste and waste is sin." Jesus said, "Gather up the crumbs that nothing be lost." Taken as whole, we have had excellent cooperation upon the part of both workers and children in carrying out our motto.

Appreciation: We deeply appreciate that some of the fine Christian Stewards, out of the abundance of their hearts and their possessions, make very fine and helpful contributions to our work. Many in a most sacrificial spirit gladly share their meager possessions for the relief and support of homeless and suffering children; thus we are made to feel all the more keenly that every contribution, large or small, coming to us for this work belongs to God, and the use thereof must be accounted for to him, together with the Southern Illinois Conference.

I feel that the land upon which this Institution is located is "Holy Ground" dedicated to the service of God, in loving, feeding, clothing, and giving Christian Training to the homeless and dependent children who become a God-given opportunity and responsibility. No single individual can claim credit for the phenomenal progress made in our Conference work for dependent children. God's blessings have been upon the efforts of the workers of the Kingdom of God as represented in the Home.

I have no words or means to adequately express my most sincere feeling of appreciation to all who have had a share in maintaining and forwarding the work of the Home. Much, indeed, is due to the untiring zeal, constant devotion and self-sacrificing service rendered by Mrs. Sowers, for and with the children and workers, assisting, at times, in the field as case-worker, filling her place as Secretary-Bookkeeper, together with a multitude of unscheduled and unexpected duties; teaching regularly in the Sunday School, speaking at Missionary meetings, and other public gatherings; doing everything in a most excellent and efficient manner.

Help-problem: The help-problem has been, and is, the most serious problem confronting the Administration of the Home. This problem applies in every department, and yet, as I contact or visit other agencies of our type, I am persuaded that we have had less trouble than others of which I know. There used to be in the Epworth League Institutes a course called "Christian Service," in which the youth were taught and urged to dedicate and train themselves for full or part-time special Christian work; this, I think, should be revived, and it could be an answer to the divine need and call in all our institutions or those of other Conferences. Too much cannot be said in praise for those who have given many years of faithful service to our Home, Miss Mary Hughes (head of our Nursery Department) now in her fourteenth year as a worker in the Home, and others who have been with us during the years of our Administration of the Home. In former years the tenure of service among employees was much less, as the records will show. The wage scale, while below what it should be, is more than double that of five years ago for care-takers and workers in the Home.

Dr. Roy N. Kean, President of our Board of Managers, is never too busy nor lacking in interest to respond to every call for council or help in the interest of the Home. He, with the Pastor of the First Methodist Church, was elected to act with the Superintendent as a Receiving Committee for children admitted to the Home. I recommend that they be re-elected for the coming year. The Building and Grounds Committee, consisting of V. E. Richardson and Rev. A. A. Hagler, have been efficient and willing in their cooperation, and are recommended for re-election. Dr. W. G. Parker, who has served as Staff Physician practically throughout the life of the Home since it was located in Mt. Vernon, has been efficient and most liberal in his professional services for the Home. His re-election is recommended. The Hon. J. Paul Carter, Attorney for the Home, and a member of the Executive Committee of the Board of Managers, has proved his great worth to the Home in his professional capacity. We deeply appreciate his kindly interest, efficient council and advice, and recommend his continuance as Attorney for the Home, and as a member of the Executive Committee of the Board of Managers.

Without a single exception we have had only the kindest reception and response of the pastors and church leaders of the Southern Illinois Conference. The Court Officials of the various Counties with whom we have necessarily had dealings have, in every instance, treated us personally, the Home, and the work with the utmost respect and consideration.

I am grateful to Dr. Roy N. Kean, to the Executive Committee, and to each member of the Board of Managers, and the multitudes of friends and well-wishers, who by their prayers, moral and financial support, have contributed toward the success of the past year's work at the Home. Rev. C. H. Todd, the Pastor of First Methodist Church and his great church have been everything they could be in their relations to the Home and for its successful operation. Much more, by way of appreciation, might be said, but, when all had been said, there would still be much more that we should like to say or write; therefore, let me include all in all that I have tried to say.

In closing this, my fifth report as Superintendent of the Home, let me

sum up by saying that the records will show that I have spoken to Churches, Sunday Schools, Youth Fellowships, other church organizations, and have broadcast over Station WEBQ once each month. In all I have spoken 879 times, directly in the interest of the Home; have traveled approximately one hundred thousand miles in these years, and that I have not taken a public offering or subscription for the Home during the time; I have taken no vacation during the years nor have I been absent from the Office as long as three days.

I want to state again that whatever success has come to the Home has been due to the marvelous blessings of God and help in the many varied ways and complex duties with which we have been confronted. God has many times verified the promise: "He will supply your needs according to his riches in glory in Christ Jesus," and in all I have been assured that "He is able to do exceedingly, abundantly, above all that we can ask or think." Then, too, I want to re-affirm all that has been said for the fine cooperation of the fine staff of Christian workers, and the support of all the churches and pastors of the Southern Illinois Conference.

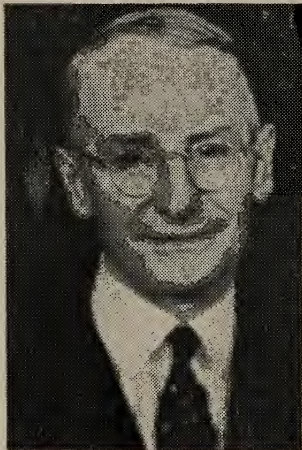

A short time after the close of the 1943 annual session of the Southern Illinois Conference of the Methodist Church, held at Carbondale, Illinois, September 22-26, 1943, at which Conference he had preached the Memorial Sermon, Rev. C. F. Corzine became ill and was taken to Barnes Hospital,



St. Louis, Mo. Later he was removed to the home of his daughter, Mrs. W. A. Robinson, Madison, Ill., in whose home he remained until December 14, 1943, when he slipped away to beloved ones and friends "over there." He had passed his sixty-fourth birthday and had had a successful ministry.

of the house of worship. During his Damaree church was built. The last four years of his work were given to the Grayville church.

Brother Corzine entered the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South at Cairo, Ill., in 1919 and was appointed to serve the Olmstead charge. Other churches in that Church which he served are El Dara, Cambria, and Salem Trinity. In 1931 he was appointed Presiding Elder of the Waverly District. Following his term on the District he served at Centralia Damaree and Grayville. Brother Corzine was a builder. He built both the congregations where he served and their properties. While pastor at Olmstead he organized the Cache church and helped in the building

Surviving members of the family are, the widow, Mrs. Maurice Baggett, Centralia, and Mrs. W. A. Robinson, Madison, Ill., daughters. Three sons also survive their father, C. F. Corzine, Jr., Centralia, Pvt. L. P. Corzine, Fort Devens, Mass., and Pvt. M. E. Corzine, New Orleans, La.

Funeral services were held Sunday, December 17th, at Grayville, in charge of Rev. Paul B. Brown, District Superintendent, Harrisburg District, assisted by Rev. N. C. Henderson, Rev. H. E. Burge, and Rev. J. W. Ditterline. Second services were held in Damaree church, Centralia with Rev. H. M. Cady, and Rev. Paul B. Brown, assisted by Rev. W. D. Humphrey, and Rev. E. U. Yates.

JOHN E. SHAFER

John Emery Shafer, son of John and Nancy Warton Shafer, was born in Marietta, Ohio, September 11th, 1867. At Allendale, Illinois, in April, 1894, he was united in marriage with Miss Mary Smith, with whom he lived happily until February 21st, 1943, when she was called to be at home in the Father's house. Following the death of his companion he went to live with his daughter Mrs. Malcolm M. Bell of Hammond, Ind.

In earlier life he taught in the Allendale and Belmont schools for a number of years prior to his entry into the ministry of The Methodist Episcopal Church. In 1901 he was admitted to membership in the Southern

Illinois Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church and served the following charges: Keensburg, Galatia, Ridgeway, Enfield, Carlyle, Pinckneyville, Effingham, Salem, Carmi, DuQuoin, retiring in 1938. After his retirement and while he was living in Mt. Carmel, Ill., he conducted services at the Keensburg Methodist Church, his first pastorate.

Rev. Shafer was of an unusually genial and friendly disposition making friends easily in every community where he held pastorates, and manifested the same genial disposition at the last annual session of his Conference, held in Carbondale, September 22-26, 1943, and was, apparently, in good health. Following his return from the Conference and while on a visit at the home of a brother, James Shafer, of Marengo, Indiana, in the early morning of October 12th, 1943 he was stricken suddenly and departed this life to be reunited with those whom he loved and had lost awhile.

Funeral services were held in the First Methodist Church, Mt. Carmel, Illinois, in charge of Rev. N. C. Henderson, District Superintendent, Olney District. Other ministers having part in the services were: W. C. Bruce, Robert Morris, Cameron Harmon, L. A. Magill, L. S. McKown, C. L. Peterson, W. E. Bennett. Interment was made in the Wabash Cemetery at Orio.

Rev. Shafer is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Malcolm M. Bell, Hammond, Indiana; a sister, Mrs. Dora Hall, Ridgeway, Illinois, and a brother, James Shafer, Marengo, Indiana.

JAMES L. WOOLVERTON

James Lafayette Woolverton, was the eldest of three sons born to Zachariah Taylor Woolverton and his wife Sarah Ann. He was born August 21, 1873, near Dresden, Weakley County, Tennessee.

At the age of seventeen he was converted and united with the General Baptist Church at Old Spring Creek, Tennessee, in which church he retained his membership over several years.

July 25th, 1895, he was united in marriage with Miss Nettie C. Turner. To this union was born seven children, three sons, and four daughters. Each of the daughters having died in infancy. Following their marriage Rev. and Mrs. Woolverton made their home in west Tennessee until 1901 when they removed to southeast Missouri. In 1902 he made his consecration to the Lord to do his will and preach the gospel, and he and his wife joined the Congregational Methodist Church at Hopewell, near Stewart, Mo. The following year he was licensed to preach, and was later ordained by Rev. J. F. Bishop, President of the Annual Conference. In 1911, Rev. Woolverton joined the St. Louis Conference of the Methodist Episcopal



Church, South, under the Presidency of Bishop House. In 1926 he transferred to the Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, and the following year removed to Illinois where he continued to serve the church until he was called from his charge here to the fellowship of the Church Triumphant.



As a minister Brother Woolverton was evangelistic and under God was used to bring many souls into the kingdom of his Lord who touched his boyish heart that distant day when he heard a kindly Presbyterian minister sing "Amazing Grace", and a light came into his soul which the unrelenting battle of nearly half a century against sin could not dim. He always served with a glad heart and mind in the fields where he was assigned by the Bishop as a builder of churches and a re-builder of broken hopes and a reviver of waning faiths among the people. When the going was hard and the way seemed dark he always found the grace to say: "Well, bless the Lord! A way will be found!" Under his leadership a way was always found. Among other churches Rev. Woolverton served Matthews and Pharis Ridge; Concord; Ruddles Chapel, all in Missouri, New Madrid, Stoddard, Scott, and Ripley churches in the same state. Pemiscot, Mississippi, Kell, Pulaski, Girard, Galatia, Grand Tower, Keysport, Xenia Ct., Sailor Springs, Harrisburg Ct., and Reevesville.

In the early weeks after his assignment to Reevesville he was stricken with pneumonia and was taken to Holden Hospital, Carbondale, Illinois. Later he was returned to his home at Reevesville where he seemed to be recovering his health, but on March 10th, 1944 he was again entered as a patient at Holden Hospital where every attention was given him. But the weight of years and the hardships he had known proved too much for his strength to endure and on April 10th, he passed quietly beyond the help of human hands to be with his Lord in a land where sickness is unknown and partings never come. In life his favorite expression was, "The Lord is with me." Now he is with his Lord. "He is resting there now, on a sun-bathed western slope, awaiting the resurrection. May the warm summer sun shine brightly there! May the gentle rains fall softly there! May the sweet green carpet lie above him . . . since we kissed him goodnight and went away. Oh, yes, we shall ever miss you, father, husband, Brother Woolverton, but tonight there is a new star in heaven, and we shall not begrudge you the eternal reward you so richly deserve. We have lost the sound of your voice and your smiling blue eyes only for a little while, but we have the deathless memory which your going left behind. "I can't say he is dead, no, he is just away with Jesus."

Funeral services were held in Carbondale Funeral Home, Wednesday, April 12th, 1944 in charge of his District Superintendent, the Rev. Paul B. Brown. Interment was made in Memorial Park, near Cape Girardeau, Mo. At the grave, a friend of many years, Dr. C. C. Hall, Chaplain at Holden Hospital, was in charge.

Surviving the deceased are his wife, Nettie C. Woolverton, and three sons: James Elbert of Blytheville, Ark., Forrest Euliss, of Cape Girardeau, Mo., and Paul Enoch, of Balboa, Canal Zone. Nine grandchildren also survive.

REV. JOHN BYRON JOHNSTON

Rev. John Byron Johnston, son of John and Sarah Johnston, was born in Pike County, Indiana, December 1st, 1863, and departed this life in Gardena, California, May 8th, 1944, aged 80 years, 5 months and 7 days. He was united in marriage to Miss Elizabeth Burchfield, also of Indiana, May 29th, 1884. To this union were born six children, four of whom preceded him to the eternal world, Ida and Claude dying in infancy while the family resided on a farm, John Irwin dying at the age of four years in St. Louis, Mo., and Mrs. Clara Atterbury who was living in Los Angeles, California, at the time of her death. Surviving children are Mrs. Mary E. White, Los Angeles, California, and Fred E. Johnston of Dorchester, Illinois. Lacking only a few days Brother and Sister Johnston walked together for sixty years, and then God took him.

Early in life, Mr. Johnston felt the call to preach the Gospel of Christ. Seeing the need for further training and pursuing his schooling, he taught school for seven years, attended Normal School at Princeton, Indiana, and was a student at Garrett Biblical Institute, Evanston, Ill.

He was received on trial in the Indiana Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church and served the following charges in that Conference: 1896 Selvin, 1897 Bowling Green, 1899 Monroe City, 1900 Pleasantville, 1903 Christney, 1905 Forest Branch, 1907 Ellettsville, 1909 Main Street, New Albany. In 1910 he transferred to the St. Louis Conference, serving at Maplewood, Mo., two years. In 1912 he transferred to the Southern Illinois Conference where he served the following charges: 1912 Shipman, 1915 Madison, 1916 Mound City, 1918 Marissa, 1921 St. Paul's E. St. Louis, 1924 Flora. In 1929 he asked for the retired relation and he and his wife moved to Los Angeles, California. Subsequent to his retirement there was need for the services of Brother Johnston as a supply and he returned from California and served Bridgeport very acceptably and then built a home at Dorchester, Ill., and planned to live there but, later he was asked to supply Okawville church which he did for three years to the delight of all the people.

Brother Johnston was a good preacher, an excellent pastor, and looked carefully after all the interests of the church. On all the charges he served he and his good wife will be remembered as faithful workers and friends of all the people. Even in their later years the young people loved them and he was able to lead them on in their efforts.

Beside the weeping wife and the two children who survive to mourn his departure, there are six grandchildren, six great-grand children, and six grand-sons-in-law who were casket bearers at the funeral service that was held at Compton, California, by Rev. John Gray Ross, minister of the First Methodist Church, Inglewood, Cal. The body was laid to rest in the beautiful Inglewood Park Cemetery, Los Angeles, to await the voice of Him who is the resurrection and the life.

ARNOLD A. FERRELL

Arnold A. Ferrell was born December 26th, 1878. He was received on trial in the Southern Illinois Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, 1921, serving the church at Bellmont; Crossville; Ridgeway; Xenia; Alma; Vernon; New Baden; Makanda; Equality; Thompsonville, retiring in 1937. Previous to his entry into the Ministry he taught school for several years.

August 1st, 1944 he suffered a heart attack and was rushed to the Ferrell Hospital where, following brief hours, he departed this life.

Rev. Ferrell is survived by four brothers, Dr. J. V. and G. C. Ferrell, Everett Ferrell of Harrisburg, Ill., and Charley of Alton, Illinois.

Interment was made in the Gintert Cemetery, at Karber's Ridge, Hardin Co., Illinois, August 3rd, 1944. Funeral services were in charge of Rev. H. E. Burge, pastor of First Methodist Church, Eldorado, Illinois.

MRS. J. S. CUMMINS

Mrs. Nancy Rice Cummins, widow of the late Rev. J. S. Cummins, for many years a member of the Southern Illinois Conference, departed this life at her home in Centralia, Illinois, May 2nd, 1944.

Born in Massac County, Illinois, September 3rd, 1868, she became the wife of Mr. J. S. Cummins, at that time a farmer and school teacher, in 1885. Later, for health reasons, Mr. Cummins and his bride removed to Arkansas, where in 1893 he united with the Methodist Conference, later transferring to the Southern Illinois Conference where he held many important pastorates and served his church as Presiding Elder.

Mrs. Cummins was a woman of more than ordinary poise and calmness of judgment, devoted to her home, her church, and her God. Four sons and one daughter survive.

Interment was made in the Metropolis Cemetery, Metropolis, Illinois.

MRS. J. G. HILDENSTEIN

Elizabeth Weiss, daughter of John and Katherine Weiss, was born near New Athens, Illinois, May 28th, 1862. Her parents were God-fearing German Methodists, her father having been for many years a local preacher, Church School Superintendent, and class leader.

September 20th, 1883, she was married to The Reverend John George Hildenstein, of the former St. Louis German Conference. She served with her minister-husband at Farmington, Mt. Vernon, and Hopewell, Mo., Altamont, Ill.; Gordonville, Mo.; Springfield, Warsaw, Ellis Grove, Edwardsville, Mascoutah, Ill.; Steinhagen, Etna, Mo.; Brighton and Fosterburg, Ill.

Following retirement in 1918 Rev. and Mrs. Hildenstein made their home in Edwardsville, Ill. Death interrupted their happy fellowship in their new home May 19th, 1920 and her minister-husband went to live in the "better land." Following his passing Mrs. Hildenstein continued to live in their Edwardsville home until failing health forced her to give up her home to live with her daughters in Minnesota. January 28th, 1944 she closed her earthly pilgrimage and went to live in the house of many mansions and to renew the beautiful fellowships begun on earth, with her loved and own.

Mary Catherine, youngest child of John Allison Murvin and Susanna Reigle Murvin, was born in Richland County, Illinois, December 18th, 1861. At the age of two years she came with her family to the Murvin farm, located one and one-half miles northeast of Shouse Chapel, with which church she united following her conversion at old Mount Olive at a revival meeting held by John D. Reeder in 1878 and during the remaining sixty-five years of her sojourn here retained her membership.

As a child she attended the public schools and later Teacher's Institutes of Clay County, having taught in Bible Grove. In the years following her marriage she studied music and languages at Garrett Biblical Institute, Evanston, Illinois.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, on motion of C. L. Peterson, the Conference ordered the reference of the Resolutions affecting the closing of the Fiscal Year of the Conference as published on pages 118, 119, of the 1943 Journal and Year Book to a Committee of three ministers and two laymen for study and report to the 1944 session of the Conference, and

WHEREAS, the 1943 session of the Conference adjourned without the naming of such Committee, and

WHEREAS, the several District Conferences did, in their plenary sessions, give added attention to the need for such Committee and did give endorsement to a Committee of five ministers and five laymen to carry forward the study called for by Dr. Peterson's motion, the personnel of such Committee having been duly considered and accepted by such District Conferences,

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Committee as endorsed by the District Conferences, together with such other person or persons as the Committee may wish to call to its assistance for such study shall become the duly elected Committee of the Conference as called for in the motion, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that such Committee shall meet at this Conference Session for such study and report its findings to this Conference for its action prior to the final adjournment of this Conference. Adopted September 21st, 1944.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS your Committee elected to study the Resolution affecting the closing of the Fiscal Year of the Southern Illinois Conference, emanating from the Commission of World Service and Finance and published on page 118 of the 1943 Journal and Year Book of said Conference, has given due study to the proposal of such resolution, and

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS by order of the Southern Illinois Conference all future sessions of the Conference have been set to open as of Wednesday morning of Conference week, and

WHEREAS such change in the day of the opening of such sessions of the Conference reduces the time allotted to the Conference Statistician and the Conference Treasurer and their respective staffs to complete their work at the Conference, and

WHEREAS there is a definite need for the study of the reports of such Conference Officers to the Conference prior to the final adjournment of the Conference session,

THEREFORE be it resolved that the Conference do order the Statistician and the Conference Treasurer and their staffs to begin their work at the seat of the Conference Monday morning of Conference week, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Conference do order that all Pastor's reports to the Annual Conference shall be mailed on or before Friday morning next prior to Monday of Conference week, addressed to the Conference Treasurer at the seat of the Conference in care of the pastor-host, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Conference Treasurer shall be ordered to close his books as of August thirty-first of the Conference Year, and instruct all pastors of the Conference to report all additional monies properly due for report to the Conference Treasurer as cash items, the same to be provided for in the form of Cashier's Check, Postal or Express money order, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Conference do order all Presidents, Superintendents, and Treasurers of Conference Institutions which are beneficiaries of the Conference to forward proper vouchers covering all funds received from the charges to the pastors of such charges on or before September tenth of the Conference Year.

RESOLUTION

Change in Standing Rule No. 15, section 1

WHEREAS there is a need for the changing of Standing Rule No. 15, section 1 so that the plan of entertainment for certain members of the Conference whose work at the seat of the Conference prior to the opening of the Conference necessitates their presence at such seat of the Conference prior to the opening of the Conference,

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the first section of Standing Rule No. 15 be so changed as to read: "The entertaining church shall provide lodging and breakfast for all Ministerial Members of the Conference, and their wives, but not for any child or children; provided request for such entertainment is filed with the entertaining Church Committee on Entertainment at least seven days preceding the opening day of the Conference; except in the case of the Statistician and Treasurer of the Conference and their respective Staffs of Assistants, whose entertainment on the same basis as above indicated shall begin as of Monday evening of Conference week, rather than as of Wednesday evening as provided for in the case of all other Ministerial members of the Conference and their wives; provided that the Statistician and the Treasurer of the Conference shall file with such entertainment Committee, their names and the names of their assistants at least seven days prior to the opening day of the Conference. If such notification shall not have been made according to the foregoing such officers of the Conference and their assistants shall bear their own expenses and entertainment for Monday and Tuesday of Conference week, following which their entertainment shall be provided for on the same basis as that affecting other Ministerial members of the Conference.

RESOLUTION**Change in Standing Rule No. 17**

WHEREAS there is a need for the changing of the Standing Rule No. 17 so that it may harmonize with the action taken by this Conference respecting the work of the Conference Statistician and the Conference Treasurer and their respective staffs.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that such standing rule be so changed as to read—The reports of the pastor's to the Annual Conference shall be mailed or sent to the seat of the Conference on or before Friday morning next prior to the Monday of Conference week, addressed to the Conference Treasurer at the seat of the Conference in care of the pastor-host. In the absence of the receipt of such reports by the time indicated the Conference Statistician and the Conference Treasurer shall be authorized to use the reports of the previous year from the charges so affected in compiling their reports to the Conference, and the names of all such delinquent charges and their pastors shall be published in the Conference Journal and Year Book for the year of such delinquency.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, by the action of the Southern Illinois Conference, as of September 25, 1943, on the motion of F. E. Harris, the Conference was pledged through the Cabinet, as it represents the Southern Illinois Conference, so far as it can, to make some provision to secure the standing and relationship of our members who enlist as Chaplains in the armed forces upon their return to civilian life and their appointment to the pastorate,

THEREFORE be it resolved, that, insofar as possible, these, our brethren, shall be received back into the fellowship of our Conference upon the same financial basis as that which they knew when they entered the Chaplaincy, provided that in so doing no displacement of other members of the Conference shall occur, and that we shall share with them such material advance as may be possible in the service of our churches, without prejudice, their qualifications and fitness, as always, for such services, being factors for Cabinet consideration.

Standing Rule No. 23

It is common knowledge that in this day of the most cruel and intense war the ages have known we are faced with an acute paper shortage. That is revealed in the continued emphasis of the Government that all of us shall use our supply carefully and save all waste paper and do whatever we can to minimize the effects of the shortage. In that connection our Church is making a constant and concerted drive to help out. It would seem, therefore, only the part of wisdom that we as a Conference should do our full share to conserve the supplies that are made available for our use.

As a part of that movement we could affect a savings by helping to avoid unnecessary mailing of forms from the office of the Secretary for use in compiling our Annual Reports to the Conference. A very definite help in that connection could be brought about by furnishing the Secretary of the Conference with the correct mailing address of every member of the Conference, particularly those in active relation to the Conference, together with the correct mailing address of all Approved Supply Pastors and others

at work in the Conference. This has not been done in the past and because of that it has frequently been necessary for the Secretary to mail out several additional sets of Conference Report Blanks.

Then, there is another reason why the Secretary should have such correct mailing address of all the ministers, since it may be necessary during the year to write them concerning individual or Conference matters. Therefore, as the Secretary of the Conference, I should like to propose the adoption of the following rule, which if adopted, shall be known as Standing Rule No. 23.

All members of the Conference together with all Accepted Supply Pastors of the Conference shall, immediately following the close of the Annual Session of the Conference, notify the Secretary of the Conference, in writing, of his or her correct mailing address, and shall, in the event of ad interim changes of such address notify the Secretary of the Conference, in writing, of such change and of their new mailing address. The addresses so provided shall be published annually in the Conference Journal and Year Book, and the Secretary shall, at all times, maintain a corrected list of all such ministers in his files for reference.

STANDING RULES OF CONFERENCE

1. When any member of the Conference intends to object to the passage of the character of any member, he shall hand the name of such member to the President, who shall pass the name by and direct the case to be investigated.

2. When any one of our members is called from earth, it shall be the duty of the nearest pastor or district superintendent of the district to notify all the preachers in the district of such death and of the time set for the funeral service.

3. At each Annual Session of the Conference a publisher shall be elected to publish the Minutes of the next Annual Session of the Conference in the Journal and Year Book of the Conference, who shall be authorized to make arrangements and enter into contract for the publication in advance of the session.

4. The district superintendent of the district and the preacher in charge of the station where the Conference is to be held, together with the presidents of the several Conference societies, are instructed to arrange the program of religious exercises and, if practicable, secure their publication in the Christian Advocate.

STANDING RULES OF CONFERENCE (Continued)

5. The Board of Conference Claimants shall consist of six ministerial members of the Conference, each of whom shall serve three years, two being elected at each annual session of the Conference. The Conference shall add two lay members of the Conference to this Board, which members shall be elected annually. The Board shall organize each year by electing a president, secretary, and treasurer, whose names shall be published in the Conference Journal and Year Book.

6. When the names of candidates for admission on trial or for orders are called, they shall, if present, be called forward and introduced to the Conference.

7. All candidates for recognition of orders shall, unless excused by vote of the Conference, be examined in the same manner as candidates for ordination, and the Committee on Conference Relation shall inquire into the character and fitness for the traveling connection of each candidate for admission on trial, for admission into full connection, or for readmission into the Conference, and all persons desiring a change of relation or any special appointment, except those taking the retired relation on reaching the age of voluntary retirement.

8. The Statistical Secretary and Conference Treasurer shall complete their work and compare their reports, and be ready to report to the Conference not later than the opening of the session of Friday morning.

9. No person in the second year's course of study shall be placed on the Statistician's or Treasurer's force.

10. The Stewards are authorized to take annually from the pro-rata due the claimants from The Book Concern a sum according to their discretion, not to exceed 10 per cent of their indebtedness to The Book Concern, until it shall be paid in full.

11. All reports of committees and resolutions shall be handed to the Secretary in duplicate.

12. No person shall have his orders recognized who comes from a church that requires a lower standard of literary qualifications than The Methodist Church, without passing an examination with us.

13. To admit on trial any candidate who is over thirty-five years of age, it shall require a two-thirds vote of all members present and voting, provided the two-thirds equal a majority of all members of the Conference.

14. We will recommend for admission into the Conference only those who are qualified and who propose to undertake regular pastoral work.

15. The plan for entertaining Annual Conference Session shall be as follows:

The entertaining church shall provide lodging and breakfast for all ministerial members of the Conference, and their wives but not for any child or children; provided request for such entertainment is filed with the entertaining Church Committee on Entertainment at least seven days preceding the opening day of the Conference; except in the case of the Statistician and the Treasurer of the Conference and their respective Staffs of Assistants, whose entertainment on the same basis as above indicated shall begin as of Monday evening of Conference Week, rather than as of Wednesday evening as provided for in the case of all other Ministerial Members of the Conference and their wives; provided that the Statistician and the Treasurer of the Conference shall file with such Entertainment Committee, their names and the names of their Assistants at least seven days prior to the opening day of the Conference. If such notification shall not have been

STANDING RULES OF CONFERENCE (Continued)

made according to the foregoing such Officers of the Conference and their Staffs of Assistants shall bear their own expenses and entertainment for Monday and Tuesday of Conference week, following which their entertainment shall be as provided for on the same basis as that affecting other Ministerial Members of the Conference.

Sec. 2. Conference Claimants and their wives, and widows of deceased ministers, shall be given full entertainment: provided that this provision shall not obtain for superannuates serving a charge. All such ministers shall come under the same provisions as those affecting ministers provided for in Sec. 1.

Sec. 3. Lay members of the Conference shall bear their own expense. We recommend that the church or churches represented by such lay members of the Conference shall provide for such member's expenses.

Sec. 4. The entertaining Church will be expected to secure room and breakfast at a reasonable rate for those who bear their own expenses, and to see that noon and evening meals may be obtained at usual prices.

16. All members of the Conference under appointment as Conference Evangelists shall, on the call of their names for passage of character, report their work for the past year, stating number and place of revival meetings held, number professed conversions, and accessions to membership of the church.

17. The reports of all pastors to the Annual Conference shall be mailed or sent to the seat of the Conference on or before Friday morning next prior to the Monday of Conference Week, addressed to the Conference Treasurer at the seat of the Conference in care of the pastor-host. In the absence of the receipt of such reports by the time indicated, the Conference Statistician and the Conference Treasurer shall be authorized to use the reports of the previous year from the charges so affected in compiling their reports to the Conference, and the names of all such delinquent charges and their pastors shall be published in the Conference Journal and Year Book for the year of such delinquency.

18. On the first day of the Conference, at the hour following the Communion Service, a memorial shall be held for the ministers and ministers' wives who have died during the year. The Bishop shall appoint someone to deliver the address, and also an alternate.

19. Any pastor desiring to be absent from Conference may be excused by reporting to his District Superintendent.

20. Beginning October 1, 1938, Institutions employing a Conference member shall be required to pay annually into the Conference Claimants' Fund an amount equal to the disciplinary rate as stated in Paragraph 952, section 5.

21. The gold headed cane bequeathed to the Southern Illinois Conference by Dr. J. A. Scaritt shall be loaned to the man, residing within the bounds of the Conference, who has been a member of the Conference for the longest term of years. It shall be returned to the Conference on his death or earlier at his election. If the member to whom the cane shall have been loaned shall remove from the territory of the Conference the cane shall be returned and loaned to the next one in line.

In case two or more members shall have the same number of years of membership, then the cane shall be loaned to the older or oldest of this number.

22. The Conference Secretary and the publisher of the Journal and

Year Book of the Conference shall edit the Minutes of each session of the Conference before the same are printed. The printed Minutes of the Conference shall be the official record of the Conference.

The publishers of the Journal and Year Book of the Conference shall furnish one copy of the Journal and Year Book, without cost, to each retired minister of the Conference, and to each widow of deceased members of the Conference.

23. All members of the Conference, together with all Accepted Supply Pastors of the Conference shall, immediately following the close of the Annual Session of the Conference, notify the Secretary of the Conference, in writing, of his or her correct mailing address, and shall, in the event of ad interim changes of such address, notify the Secretary of the Conference, in writing of such change and of their new mailing address. The addresses so provided shall be published annually in the Conference Journal and Year Book, and the Secretary shall, at all times maintain a corrected list of all such ministers in his files for reference.

24. It shall require the vote of two-thirds of those present and voting to change or suspend any of these rules, except the rule determining the admission on trial in the Conference of any Candidate who has passed his thirty-fifth birthday, which rule has its own provisions.

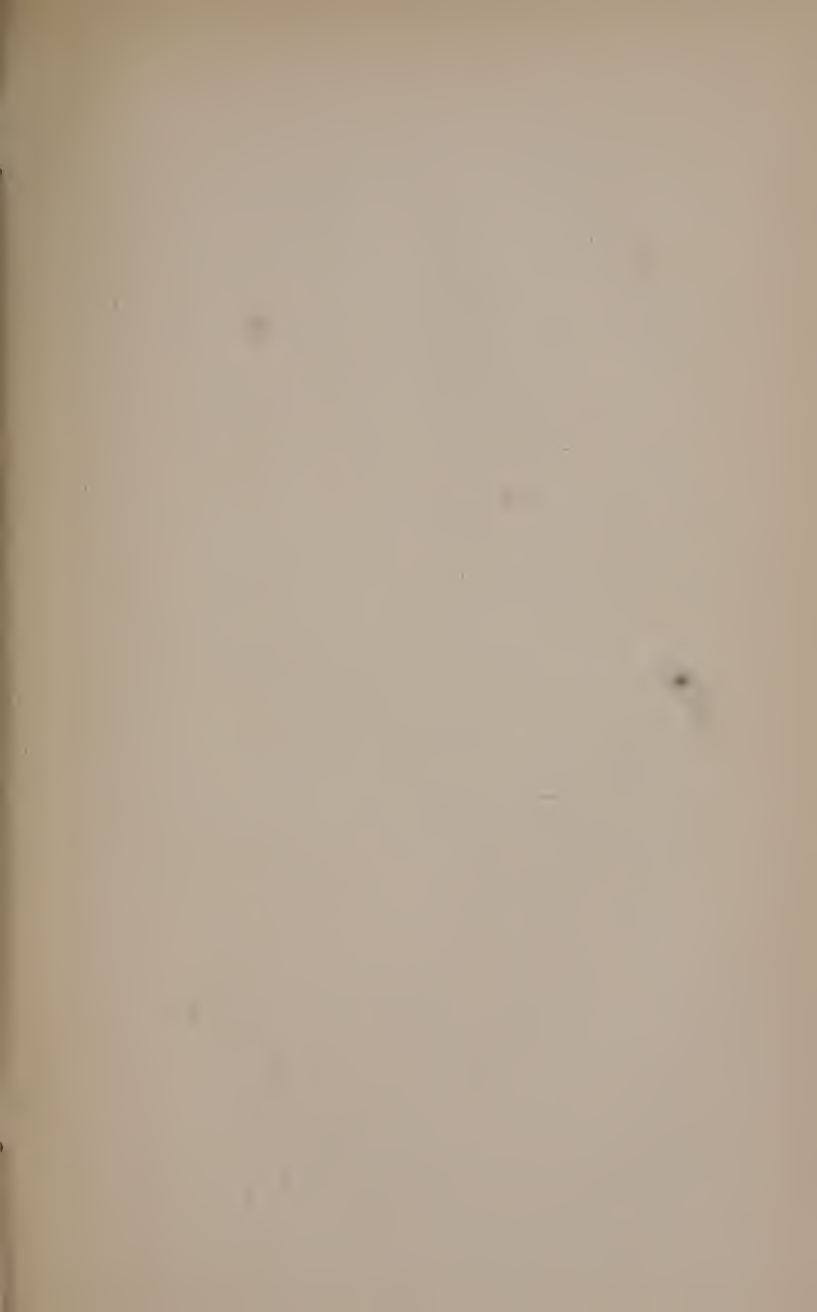

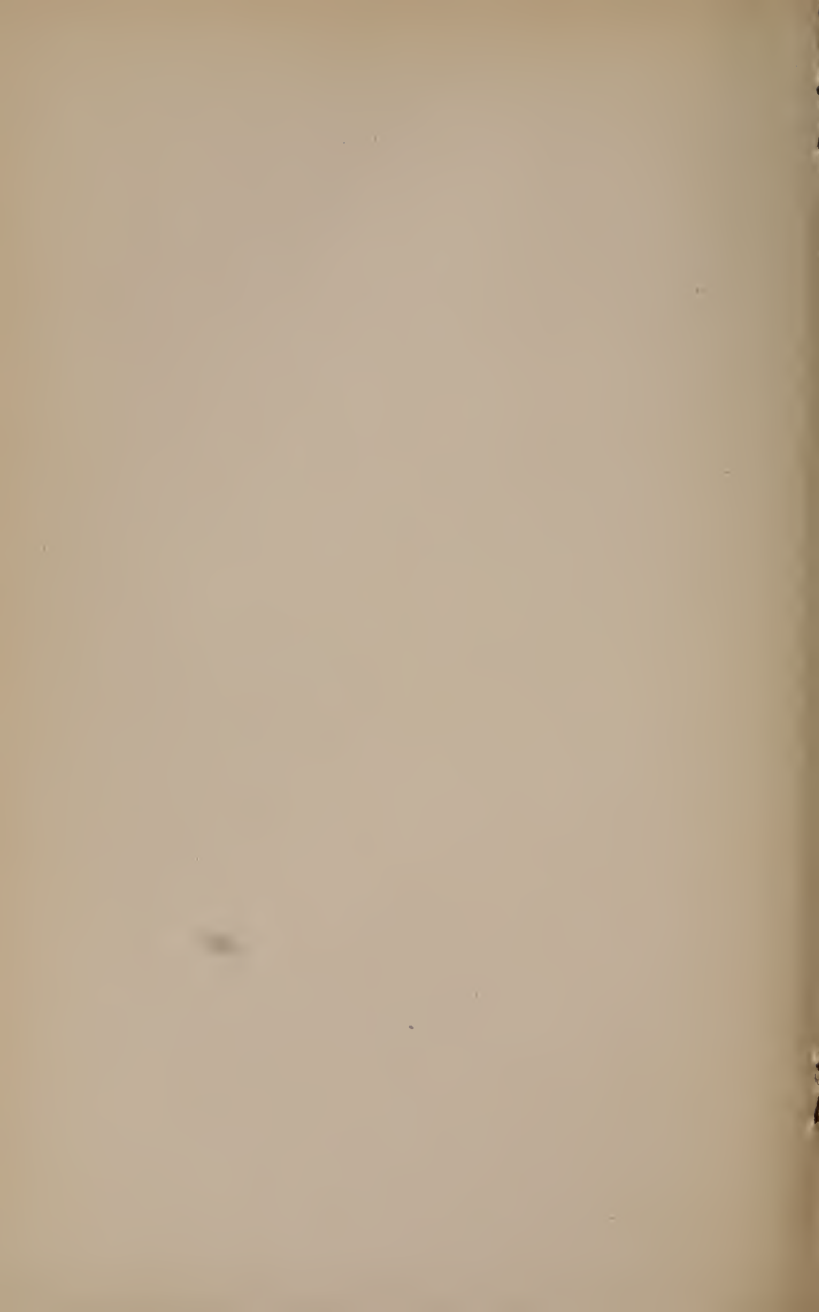

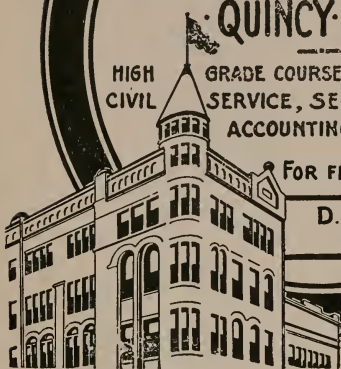
