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

ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY-FIFTH ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

THE Yearly Conference of the People called Methodists, in the Connexion established by the late Rev. John Wesley, A.M., assembled in Hull, on Tuesday, July 19, 1898, and concluded its sittings on Wednesday, August 3, 1898.

The number of the Legal Conference was completed by the election of William Perkins, Charles H. Crookshank, M.A., Henry Soper, and Nehemiah Curnock (B), in the place of William F. Moulton, M.A., D.D., William Crook, D.D., John Evans (B), and Robert Newton Young, D.D., deceased.

The Rev. Hugh Price Hughes, M.A., was elected President of the Conference, and the Rev. Marshall Hartley was reelected Secretary.

The Rev. James D. Tetley, Supernumerary Minister, was declared to have ceased, by lapse of time, to be a member of the Legal Conference. The Rev. Henry Bone was elected in his place.

The Pastoral Session adjourned on Friday, July 22. The Representative Session assembled on Monday, July 25, and concluded its business on Friday, July 29. The Pastoral Session was resumed, and completed its business on Wednesday, August 3. At the end of each Session the Minutes of the Session were read. Q. VI. What Ministers have died since the last Conference?

A. I. In Great Britain, forty-four:

(1) HENRY PRITCHARD: born at Glair Conway, Denbighshire in 1844. Converted to God in his youth, he began to preach early, entering the Ministry in 1866. He devoted his life to the interests of Methodism in the South Wales District, rendering good service as Superintendent and District Financial Secretary. He was profoundly attached to the Church of his choice, and an able defender of its doctrines and principles. His personal character was pure and high, his piety cheerful, his home always bright with praise and prayer. He was a fine theologian, a valiant and successful temperance advocate, and a most interesting public speaker. His preaching was marked by fearlessness, incisiveness, and reverence for the word of God. In debate he was somewhat caustic, but the purity of his motives was fully admitted by those who differed from him. His public prayers and his counsels in the class-meeting and the Synod will be long remembered. Some years before death his health began to fail, and at the Conference of 1896 he became a Supernumerary for one year, in the hope that rest would restore his strength. In 1897 he made a voyage to the Canary Islands; but on his return voyage, after conducting a service on board ship on the Sunday morning, he was taken very ill. Reaching Liverpool with difficulty, he sought the residence of his friend the Rev. John Hughes (c), where he expired in perfect peace on August 3, 1897, in the fifty-fourth year of his age and the thirty-first of his ministry.

- (2) CALEB FOSTER: born at Eydon, Northamptonshire, April 10, 1835, died at Bowdon, August 4, 1897, completing the fortieth year of his ministry. His father and mother were godly, and at an early age he made his decision for Christ. From the first he felt impelled to the work of the Ministry, and, to use his own words, durst not refuse the divine call. He had an honourable career. His devotion to his work, his intensity of purpose, his large-heartedness and deep sympathy, his courage which could be firm even to sternness and make him dare to stand alone, and his appreciation of types of excellence differing from his own, made him trusted by his colleagues and beloved by the people. In the earlier period of his ministry he was a successful revivalist; and, to the end of his life, the passion of the evangelist was upon him. His last public utterance was at a funeral, when he was suddenly moved to make an earnest appeal to the bystanders; and, by a strange coincidence, he now sleeps beneath the spot on which he then stood. The last four years of life were marked by much suffering, and his ministerial service was somewhat broken and irregular. The nature of the illness, with its attendant spasms of pain, caused him at times to become despondent; but, between the attacks, he wrought with his old spirit of devotion, and shared the joy of service. last illness was brief, though severe; Christ was to him a bright reality, and he passed away with the thrice-repeated words upon his lips, "I am going home."
- (3) JOHN COOPER: born on April 12, 1827, at Bedford and educated in the Grammar School there. Early in life,

through the instrumentality of an aunt, he was brought to the Saviour, and led into fellowship with the Church. His piety was bright and attractive. When eighteen years of age he was called to preach, and soon his gifts and graces marked him out for the wider sphere of ministerial service. He greatly valued the advantages derived from three years at Richmond College. An able and effective preacher, his pulpit ministrations, whilst eminently calculated to edify believers, were also often owned of God in the conversion of sinners. He was a diligent pastor of the flock of Christ, and though none in the fold was neglected, yet the poor were specially the objects of his sympathetic and practical attention. Endowed with considerable business capacity, he contributed largely to the consolidation and extension of the work of God in the various Circuits in which he laboured. His loyalty to our ecclesiastical economy, and firm and judicious administration of the affairs of the Church, commanded admiration and affectionate regard. health compelled him somewhat early to retire from the active Ministry, but his interest in Circuit and Connexional work remained unabated. As far as opportunity offered he preached the word, and as a class-leader it was his delight to do what he could for the perfecting of the saints and the building up of the body of Christ. As secretary to the Annuitant Society, and in the office of the Chapel Committee, he rendered valuable service to Methodism. His last affliction was protracted, but with patience he endured his sufferings. died in the triumph of the faith at Heaton Moor, Stockport, August 5, 1897, in the forty-sixth year of his ministry.

(4) Thomas WILDE: born on February 25, 1826. In early life he accepted Christ as his Saviour and Lord. He was educated at Woodhouse Grove School. In 1848 he was received as a Candidate, and sent to Didsbury College, where he remained three years. By scholarly aptitude and diligent study he prepared himself for the manifold duties of

the Christian ministry. As time advanced his fine qualities were increasingly recognised, and he was called to labour in some of the most important Circuits of Methodism. gentleness and refinement of his nature prevented him from seeking publicity. His influence was quiet, but real and helpful. His ministry was expository, experimental, and practical. Sincere and earnest people found in his prayers, pastoral addresses, and sermons, real direction and assistance. pastor, he was diligent and conscientious. The subdued cheerfulness of his temperament fitted him, in no ordinary degree, for the gentle ministrations of the home and the sickroom. In administration he excelled. He was well acquainted with our Church constitution, methodical in his business habits, and successful in the management of Circuit affairs. Widely read in both ancient and modern theology, he was also familiar with our finest English literature. Loyal to the best traditions and usages of Methodism, he was at the same time thoroughly catholic in his ecclesiastical sympathies. councils of his Church, and especially in the education of young ministers, he took a keen interest. His influence on his colleagues was refining and stimulating, and many of them owe much to his wise counsels, intellectual tastes, and genuine godliness. He was the soul of honour, truth, purity, and charity. In 1800 he was elected into the Legal Conference. After an active ministry extending over forty-two years he retired and settled at Thornton Hough, near Birkenhead. Here he continued his pulpit and pastoral work, enjoying the evening of life. On August 8, 1897, he preached twice in the Tiviot Dale Chapel, Stockport; and on the following Saturday, in the hospitable home of a dear friend he unexpectedly "fell on sleep."

(5) WILLIAM AINSWORTH: born at Hawkingstone, in the parish of Haworth, on April 25, 1839. When nearly sixteen he was converted. In December, 1858, he preached his first sermon, which gave evidence of much ability. His preach-

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ing was deeply theological and intensely earnest, and in his early ministry he was remarkably successful in winning He had great force of character, and threw all his strength into everything he did. Unusual depth of sympathy for others, aided by an absolute self-forgetfulness, led him continually to perform deeds of unexpected kindness. dearly loved Methodism. Its polity became very familiar to him, and he made it his constant study to bring all the details of Circuit life into harmony with it. As a Superintendent, he was strong, kind, and brotherly. his Circuits could bear testimony to his uprightness and consistency, his fearlessness mingled with gentleness; and each could tell how skilfully he managed difficult business, so as to secure general harmony. In consequence of an accident he became entirely helpless, suffering excruciating agony; yet through three years' illness his native cheerfulness never forsook him, and he constantly found the grace of God sufficient. He entered into rest on August 15, 1897, in the fifty-ninth year of his age, and the thirty-fifth of his ministry.

(6) WILLIAM EVANS (A): born at Amlwch, Anglesey, in 1833; died at Holyhead, September 6, 1897. Converted at an early age under the ministry of the late Rev. Evan Pugh, he was accepted as a Candidate for the Ministry by the Conference of 1856. There being no vacancy in the Welsh work at the time, he was engaged as a hired local preacher for three years. In 1859 he was appointed to Bangor. He was a man of superior mental ability, of a metaphysical turn of mind, well versed in philosophy and history, and a good musician. He contributed a large number of valuable articles to the Wesleyan (Welsh) Magazine, and published a periodical called the Welsh Philosopher, which was highly appreciated by a large number of Welsh readers. His preaching, while marked by deep insight into spiritual truth, was at the same time evangelical and practical; his delivery

was natural, pleasing, and powerful, and through his ministry many were led to a saving knowledge of the truth. He visited America in 1894-5, and travelled across that continent, preaching and lecturing in English and Welsh. It is feared that this visit tended to shorten his life. His last illness was short but painful. After remaining in a semiconscious condition for some days, he passed away peacefully in the sixty-fourth year of his age, and the thirty-ninth of his ministry.

(7) SAMUEL WESLEY: born in Birmingham on July 8, 1817. His parents were devoted Methodists, who early associated their child with the services of God's house, and carefully fostered his religious life. The early death of his mother led him to serious thought, and ere long to a conscious experience of saving grace. He at once began to witness for the Master and to devote his gifts to various forms of Christian service. When twenty-one years of age he was accepted for the Ministry. After some time spent at the Hoxton Institution he was sent into Circuit work, and for forty-four years continued to discharge the duties of a Methodist minister with exemplary fidelity and diligence. His conduct of public worship was devout; his prayers were full of fervour; his preaching expository and practical. He took great care in the preparation of his sermons, which were often delivered with much power, and resulted in the awakening and conversion of many. He was a man of saintly character, and of a kindly and genial disposition. A diligent and faithful pastor and administrator in all his Circuits, he won for himself a good report and many friends. After retiring from the active work he spent several vears in pastoral oversight of the military at Hounslow and other centres. In 1896, in consequence of rapidly declining health, he retired to Raunds, where, after a comparatively short but severe illness, he passed to his rest on October 1, 1897, his dying testimony being, "Tell my friends, both military and civilian, that I am going home."

(8) GEORGE MEADOWS: born at Woolwich on May 23, 1823; died at Plymouth on October 3, 1897. His parents were devoted Christians, and under their godly training he was converted at the age of fourteen. In 1847 he was accepted as a Candidate, and set apart for foreign missionary work. After nine years' diligent and successful service in Western Africa he returned to England, and for twenty-seven years laboured earnestly and faithfully. At the Conference of 1883 he became a Supernumerary, and, on account of prolonged affliction, his remaining years were passed in almost complete retirement. He continued to evince the deepest interest in the prosperity of the kingdom of God, but was seldom able to preach or to take any part in public worship. He often endured intense pain, and with advancing years his sufferings became more and more acute. Towards the end of life he evidently desired to depart, though he awaited without a murmur the Lord's appointed time. He attended public service on Sunday morning August 22, 1807, and on returning home made special reference to the delight with which he had joined in singing the words of the concluding hymn-

> And soon my spirit, in His hands, Shall stand where my Forerunner stands.

The next day he was overtaken by what proved to be his last attack; and on Saturday evening, October 2, 1897, after weeks of agony, he fell into a peaceful slumber, during which, on the following morning, he passed away. Affectionate in disposition, modest and devout in demeanour, heartily loyal to Methodist doctrine and discipline, unwearying in service, "patient in tribulation," he was emphatically "a good man" and "a faithful minister of Christ."

(9) Griffith Jones: born at Aberdaron, Carnarvonshire, in 1830. His father was a Calvinistic Methodist, but his mother was a zealous member of our Church. The boy threw in his lot with his mother's people. In after years he made diffigent study of our doctrines, and his faith in them grew

deeper from year to year. He was never troubled about the reality of his conversion. He had had a severe struggle, which continued, like that of Jacob, throughout one memorable night. In 1857 he was accepted as a Candidate, and for a period of thirty-four years laboured diligently in the work, with much acceptance. While stationed in 1801 at Pwllheli, his native Circuit, he was seized with paralysis, and became a Supernumerary. He possessed superior mental endowments, which were cultivated by reading and study. He had also independence of judgment in a marked degree. and a strong individuality. His ideal of preaching was high, and his sermons were well prepared and full of gospel truth. He filled the position of Secretary for the Loan Department of the North Wales Chapel Fund for many years, discharging its duties firmly and faithfully. A man of undoubted godliness, he was loyal to his brethren, zealous for the right, and his influence in all his Circuits was a power for good. During his last years he resided at Portmadoc. He died in great peace on October 7, 1897, in the sixty-seventh year of his age and the forty-first of his ministry.

(10) John Weatherill: born near Ripon, April 26, 1823. His parents were godly Methodists, who, on removing to Leeds while their son was yet young, worshipped in Wesley Chapel. Here he was brought to God through the labours of the late Rev. John Rattenbury. He entered our Ministry in 1847, and for forty-three years served the Church with ability and fidelity. His earliest Circuits were in the north of England, and there he saw hundreds of souls converted to God. A diligent reader, his sermons were the fruit of much thought, and highly valued by the more instructed and spiritual of our congregations. In the homes of the people, especially among the sick and discouraged, he was always welcome, because his lowliness, sympathy, and spiritual wisdom made his presence everywhere a blessing. He was tender and constant in his friendships, free from

all censoriousness and unworthy jealousies. That the work of God might prosper, or to try any experiment with a view to its prosperity, he would readily stand aside for others. In one or two instances the Conference selected him to superintend Circuits where local complications and disquiets had arisen, and he did not fail to justify the confidence reposed His closing years were in his wisdom and moderation. spent as a Supernumerary at Topsham, in the Exeter Circuit. Here he lost his wife, and henceforth his conversation and demeanour were markedly those of a man who felt the evening had come. In preaching, meeting classes, conducting a teachers' weekly preparation class, and in pastoral visitation, he filled this season of waiting. His last service, ten days before his death, was held in the Topsham chapel, and was preceded by an address out of doors. His Master found him watching and girded. He died on October 21, 1897, in the seventy-fifth year of his age, and the fifty-first of his ministry.

(11) JOHN EVANS: born at Eglwysbach, in the county of Denbigh, September 28, 1840. He was brought up in a godly Methodist home, and at the age of fourteen was led to give his heart to God. He began to preach soon after attaining his seventeenth year. Accepted as a Candidate in 1860, he was appointed to a Circuit in 1861. From that date his popularity as a preacher steadily grew. Twenty years of his ministerial career were spent in Liverpool and London. and sixteen in Wales. He visited the United States of America on two occasions, during which he was the means of establishing several Welsh Methodist Churches. His services were in constant demand, both as a preacher and lecturer; but he never allowed such engagements to divert his attention from Circuit duties. As a popular preacher, he held, by general consent, a leading position in the Principality. He possessed a sound and vigorous understanding, an exuberant fancy, a manner at once striking and pleasing, and a voice

whose well-modulated tones were singularly effective. His sermons were popular and rich in thought, sympathetic, appealing powerfully to the conscience, and resulting, almost without exception, in the conversion of souls. He was an assiduous student of every branch of knowledge which might prove helpful to the preacher. He wrote several important Welsh books, and his lucid and beautiful style has secured him a place amongst the Welsh classics. His ability and services to Methodism were recognised by his election in 1884 to the Legal Conference; and his services to the Principality led to his election as a life member of the governing body of the University College of Wales. was appointed to take charge of a mission at Pontypridd. A membership of sixteen was handed over to his care. He applied himself vigorously to his task, and was soon repaid by finding the townhall, wherein he conducted his services, filled to overflowing. In course of time he formed a regular Church, and established a sisterhood and class-meetings. In 1895 he was appointed Chairman of the District. entailed additional care and responsibility. His incessant preaching and lecturing tours, with a view to meet the growing financial demands of the mission, ultimately overtaxed his strength. In September, 1806, he was advised to take entire rest for three months, owing to heart affection. He proceeded to the East, where he remained until the spring of 1807. On his return he strove hard to make good the deficit in his special mission. This strain preved upon a weakened constitution, but he kept well to his work and public engagements. On Saturday, October 23, 1897, he went to Liverpool to conduct the anniversary services at Shaw Street Welsh chapel. He was still feeling the effects of a cold contracted after preaching earlier in the week, and he expressed a desire to retire early, at the same time appearing cheerful as usual. Having joined his host and family in singing a hymn and in prayers, he repaired to his room. A little later his wife detected a sudden change, and called

for help, which came instantly; but he had breathed his last. He finished his earthly course in the fifty-eighth year of his age and the thirty-seventh of his ministry.

- (12) JOHN PARSONS: born at Dudley in September, 1822. Converted to God in early life, he at once gave himself earnestly to Christian work. He was accepted as a Candidate for our Ministry in 1845, and was sent to Edinburgh to supply for the Rev. John M'Lean. His ability as a preacher was at once recognised, and he continued to labour in that city for two years. He early fell a victim, however, to nervous prostration; but though suffering much and frequently, he bore his weakness with patience and fortitude. His devotion to duty was thorough, and his piety sincere and deep. The Circuits in which he travelled were, for the most part, wide, and the long journeys often tried him; but he never neglected his duty. He was a diligent pastor, giving much time to the sick, and a painstaking Superintendent. In 1879 he became a Supernumerary, and spent the last years of his life in the Highgate Circuit, where he was much respected and beloved. He passed away in the full faith and hope of the gospel on November 3, 1897, in the seventy-sixth year of his age and the fifty-third of his ministry.
- (13) John Gibson (B): born at Harrington, in the county of Cumberland. Influenced by careful religious training, he was converted to God in childhood, and in his eleventh year joined the Wesleyan Methodist Church. He commenced to preach when seventeen years of age, and in 1866 was accepted as a Candidate and entered Didsbury College, where he spent three happy years. In all the Circuits in which he travelled he was greatly beloved. His ministry was remarkable for intense earnestness and high spiritual tone. Although far from robust, he did not spare himself, constantly evincing the strongest desire to conserve and advance the interests of Christ's kingdom. His preaching was vigorous and practical, always

characterised by intense sympathy. As a Superintendent, he manifested conspicuous ability, and by the charm of his character gathered around him those who gladly and willingly co-operated with him in the service of the Master. He was held in high esteem by his colleagues, who cherish his saintly memory. His Christian confidence and triumph at the close of life were complete. A few days before he passed away he said to one of his colleagues, "Give my love to the people, and tell them that the same truths I have preached to others I now find precious to myself"; and also, "I have never had a moment's rebellion against the will of God." A few hours before he died it was suggested that a verse of his favourite hymn, "Jesu, Lover of my soul," should be sung. To the surprise of all present, when the lines were reached—

Thou, O Christ, art all I want, More than all in Thee I find!

he joined in the singing as far as failing strength would permit. "He was a good man, and full of the Holy Ghost and of faith." He peacefully passed away on November 20, 1897, in the fiftieth year of his age, and the thirtieth of his ministry.

(14) George Barlow: born at Rotherham, May 14, 1837. Under a sermon preached by Mr. Isaac Marsden he realised his need of saving grace. Having sought this earnestly and found it, he at once entered upon Christian service. The call to the work of the Ministry came soon afterwards. He was accepted by the Conference of 1860, and immediately sent into Circuit work. The first six years of his ministry were spent in Scotland, and were characterised by cheerful and unflagging devotion to his Master's service. His subsequent career was marked by equal diligence and fidelity. His sermons were carefully prepared, and were clear and forceful expositions of evangelical truth. As a pastor, he carried into the homes of his people a singularly bright and buoyant spirit; as a Superintendent, he combined

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sagacity with enterprise and sustained energy. He was a conscientious and unostentatious builder up of the Church. Besides thorough attention to Circuit duties, he prepared several volumes for the "Preacher's Homiletical Commentary." He was also a frequent contributor to American religious periodicals. His life had a tragic termination. Shortly after the last Conference, his health failing, he sought to regain it by rest and change. It was specially noted, during this time, that in his prayers he pleaded with pathetic fervour for perfect resignation to the divine will. Under medical advice he resolved upon a sea voyage. When in the English Channel, during a stormy night, the ship he sailed in collided with another vessel and foundered. He was seen by some of the survivors at the last moment standing on deck, calmly manifesting that resignation to the divine will for which he had so earnestly prayed. exchanged mortality for life on November 28, 1897.

(15) CHARLES WILLIAM BARBER: born on March 7, 1867. He was converted when nine years old, began to preach at sixteen, and was an accepted Candidate at nineteen. After three years at Handsworth College and two on the President's List of Reserve, he was appointed successively to the Shotley Bridge and Canning Town Circuits, in each of which he did earnest and successful work. His last sphere of labour was the East End Mission, to which he went full of hope and enthusiasm. For the poor, the downtrodden, and the degraded he had a deep and abiding love. His great joy was to preach to them in street, court, and alley, as well as in the house of God, the "unsearchable riches of Christ." "The common people heard him gladly," and as the result of his ministry many were added to the Lord. When entering on his second year's work in the East End he was smitten down with typhoid fever, and after five weeks' illness passed to his reward on November 30, 1897. He was a lovable man, with a singularly pure and humble disposition. He was as brave as he was modest, and as strong as he was tender. His passion for souls was intense: on one occasion he was heard to say, "If by dying I could save them, I would gladly do it." On passing through some slums he was powerfully "moved with compassion" for the people, and went home to plead for their salvation. His own expression was, "I cried and cried, and cried again in my helplessness to save them." Only the morning of life was his, but it was devoted wholly to his Master. His short ministerial course was marked by faithfulness and devotion of the highest order. His unfailing cheerfulness and generous sympathy won for him a warm place in the hearts of the tried and suffering. His memory, especially among the poor, is "as ointment poured forth."

(16) WILLIAM ALLEN (c): born at Upton, near Andover. in 1818, and in early life brought to a saving knowledge of Christ. Soon after his conversion he became an earnest worker in the village chapels. His intelligence and fervour indicated abilities for a wider sphere of usefulness, and at the Conference of 1844 he was accepted for the Ministry. His first appointment was Spalding, where he entered upon his work with great ardour. For forty-three vears he discharged the duties of his office with more than ordinary diligence and success. In 1887 he became a Supernumerary, after which he was associated with the Finsbury Park Circuit for two years, where he rendered faithful service in the first days of the Willoughby Road Society. From 1889 to 1896 he was connected with the Central London Mission. His sermons were carefully prepared and delivered with great fervour. He was awarded several prizes for sermons on the obligation of the Christian Sabbath. Everybody was impressed with his evident sincerity and He lived with God and for God. His modesty and humility were remarkable. He esteemed others better than himself. A true friend, he was greatly beloved by all with whom and for whom he laboured. Perhaps the outstanding feature of his ministerial life was his pre-eminent gift in public prayer. His petitions were the utterance of a man who knew his way in reverence and with power to the throne of grace. He was deeply interested in all Methodist affairs, particularly in modern home missionary methods. He had a great passion for the conversion of the masses. A generous man, he was ever ready to bear his part of the cost of any good enterprise, and frequently denied himself that he might give to the cause of God. His end was somewhat sudden, but he was thoroughly prepared for the Master's call, and quietly entered into rest on December 29, 1897, at New Southgate, in the Finsbury Park Circuit.

(17) JOHN ANDERSON, the son of the late Rev. Henry Anderson: born at High Wycombe, August 26, 1814. He was educated in part at Woodhouse Grove School, and became a local preacher in Gainsborough. He entered the Ministry in 1836, and served for the most part in wide country Circuits until 1882, when he became a Supernumerary and settled at Lytham. Fidelity to duty in the most minute particulars was a striking characteristic. As a preacher, he was most at home in dealing with the practical side of Christianity, and was often exceedingly powerful in appealing to the unconverted. Pastoral visitation was never neglected, though his naturally retiring disposition made this work in his case one of more than common difficulty. The sick and poor found in him a sympathising friend, and in every Circuit he won respect and love. He was an extensive reader of general as well as theological literature, catholic in his sympathies, yet intensely strong in his attachment to Methodism; over all its developments he watched with a kindly though jealous care. For two years before death he suffered much from weakness, and was almost entirely confined to his room; but the long affliction was borne with exemplary patience. He testified repeatedly to his enjoyment of peace with God, and his reliance on the merits of the atonement. He died on December 29, 1897, in the eighty-fourth year of his age, and the sixty-second of his ministry.

(18) JOHN BURTON: born at Snaith, December 27, 1805. In early youth he was converted to God, and entered the Ministry in 1825. For several years he laboured assiduously in the West Indies, returning in 1832, as it was supposed, in a hopeless decline. A year's rest renewed his health, but left him with a permanently enfeebled voice. Though more than once subsequently prostrated by illness, he prosecuted his ministry in the home Circuits from that time onwards till 1871, when he retired from the active work. He was spared through a lingering eventide of life, and continued to preach while strength allowed, publishing also in 1883 a volume of sermons which met with considerable acceptance. In the decay of the body, his mind retained its clearness and something of its vigour to the last; and he awaited his release in the full assurance of faith, until patience was perfected in him. house was manifestly built upon the Rock, and the floods that beat heavily thereon had no power to shake it. "My hand," he said, "is held in His, where it was put long ago." another time: "Oh, how I have suffered! but I have learnt, and I thank Him for all." He fell asleep very peacefully, at Headingley, on December 29, 1897, having just entered on the ninety-third year of his age. John Burton was endowed with great natural gifts and force of character. He was a man of dignified presence and bearing, of high spirit and resolute temper, of reserved and reflective disposition. His affections were intense though undemonstrative; his imagination lofty; his intelligence keen, logical, and comprehensive; his diction incisive, vivid, original. Self-educated for the most part, and always showing an independent mind, he was a deep student of the things of God, a wide reader, a hard thinker, a close observer of life. His faculties were concentrated upon his pulpit ministry, in which he attained, despite his physical disadvantages, a commanding eminence, ranking in the judg-

ment of many amongst the ablest preachers of his time. His measured, quiet utterances possessed an arresting and penetrating quality: he spoke with the conscious authority of an ambassador for Christ, and as one who saw the Invisible and looked into the secret hearts of men. He occupied himself with the main themes of the gospel, bending all his knowledge and every power to the service of "Jesus Christ and Him crucified." He dwelt much upon the stern and sublime aspects of truth, while he set forth with appealing pathos the divine compassions, exhibiting in their blended · grandeur "the goodness and the severity of God." He was a faithful pastor, devoted to his Circuit, kindly and genial to the young, attentive to the sick of the flock, fearless in correction and reproof, yet "bearing gently with the ignorant and erring." This master in Israel gathered round him, from place to place. a circle of warmly attached and studious disciples, drawn from many ranks in society and often from amongst those untouched by other ministrations, on whom his influence was profound and abiding. Many of these will doubtless prove his joy and crown of rejoicing in the day of Christ.

(19) WILLIAM RUSSELL, a native of North Shields: born in 1841. He was converted to God during a revival in that town, in which the late Dr. and Mrs. Palmer, of America, took a prominent part. At the age of twenty-three he was admitted as a student of Richmond College, and after a three years' course entered into Circuit work. His knowledge of Methodist law and discipline, his diligent attention to Circuit duties, his wise and energetic administration, combined with his kind and cheerful demeanour, won all hearts. An indefatigable worker, he was exceptionally influential with the young. His sermons were clear expositions of the truth, forcefully applied, his only aim being to lead his hearers to Christ. Last September, full of hope and zeal, he entered upon the work of the Cullingworth Circuit, but was soon prostrated by sickness, and, despite the exertion of an almost indomitable will and

intense yearning for his work, the disease rapidly gained ground. The end came suddenly. At the dawn of the new year, January 1, 1898, he peacefully passed away, in the fifty-seventh year of his age and the thirty-second of his ministry.

(20) ROBERT HOPKINS MOLE, son of the Rev. R. Richardson Mole: born at Shaftesbury in 1829, and educated at Kingswood School. At the age of twenty-five he commenced business for himself, but three years later was constrained to offer for the Ministry. He was accepted by the Conference of 1857, and sent at once to a Circuit. His preaching was of the old Methodist type, earnest, lucid, persuasive, and full of unction. His public prayers were remarkable for their breadth, sympathy, and spiritual influence. Many were the joy and crown of his ministry. In several of his Circuits gracious revivals attended his preaching, notably at Thetford and Gower, where two new chapels were built. Whilst resident at Gosport and Sheerness he acted as chaplain to the soldiers and sailors, whom he loved with an ardent affection which they cordially reciprocated. Intensely interested in young people, he yearned over them with paternal solicitude. He was never happier than when surrounded by young life. Several of his spiritual children are to-day in the Ministry. He was a model pastor, diligent, methodical, faithful, and gifted with an extraordinary sympathy, whic' won for him troops of friends. He was extremely sensitive, and carried the sorrows of others on his heart. The last years of his life were spent in comparative retirement; but his thoughts and conversation were full of Christ, and it was with difficulty that he was restrained from public engagements. After the death of Mrs. Mole he passed through a period of keen mental conflict, and was much depressed at times by a sense of loneliness; yet his faith enabled him to say, "Thy will be done," and almost his last words, addressed to his son just before the final seizure, were: "Never mind, my boy. Trust

in God. It will be all right." Peacefully, as a veteran whose work is done, he passed away on January 9, 1898.

(21) JOHN VINCENT BRAINERD SHREWSBURY: born at Cape Town, August 31, 1826. He was educated at Woodhouse Grove School and University College, converted in his fifteenth year, and entered the Ministry in 1849. In Bath and other of his earlier Circuits, his labours were attended by conspicuous success; indeed, throughout his whole course, his ministry was fruitful in conversions. In every mode and department of Christian work he acquitted himself as an "able minister of the New Testament." His preaching was earnest and persuasive, beautified by apt quotations from Holy Scripture. Throughout his ministry, great prominence was given to the doctrine of scriptural holiness. Acutely sensitive to every token of the divine Presence, he was tenderly and intensely "alive unto God." a man of much prayer, in conducting public devotions he often constrained fellow worshippers to feel that close communion with God was his frequent privilege. In all the characteristics of an earnest Christian he attained a high degree; in patient endurance of common troubles, and in trustful and even cheerful submissiveness to the will or God, he met the highest claims of fidelity and consistency. He was a model member of the ministerial brotherhood, considerate, delicately courteous, and, as need arose, active in chivalrous self-devotion. His exceptional influence over the young was due to his quick and genuine sympathy, and to the impression made by his elevated and saintly character. In 1888 he was elected into the Legal Conference; and in 1804, after three years in the Halifax Place Circuit. became a Supernumerary, and settled in Nottingham. strength permitted, he continued to preach and visit the sick; and, by his active interest in evangelical work, his breadth of sympathy, and thoroughly catholic sentiments. he won the esteem and confidence of all the Churches.

On the first Sabbath of the year he took part in the Covenant Service at Tennyson Street chapel. This was his last public work. On Monday he was seized with bronchitis; his strength was speedily exhausted; and on January 14, 1898, "he fell asleep," in the seventy-second year of his age, and the forty-ninth of his ministry.

(22) HENRY WILKINSON WILLIAMS, D.D.: born in Bristol on February 20, 1810, and died in London on January 23, 1898. He entered the Ministry in 1832, and retired from active work in 1879, having given nearly half a century of valuable service to the Church he so ardently loved. The religious life of this greatly honoured and revered minister began when a boy at school, and truly it might be said of him that "he feared God from his youth." He received a classical education, and in early life laid the foundation of accurate scholarship. His natural gifts and highly cultivated mind were soon employed in the service of his Lord and Master. Consciously at peace with God, he glowed with holy zeal to publish the glad tidings which had made him so happy. He became a local preacher, but his distinguished gifts and qualifications marked him out for a higher and wider sphere. In his early years in Bristol he had the advantage of sitting under the ministry of such men as Joseph Sutcliffe, James Wood, Jacob Stanley, Joseph Entwisle, and Richard Watson, and from them, while his character was still forming, he received a richer and fuller view of divine truth. long and unbroken series of years he laboured in some of the most important Circuits in Methodism. As Superintendent of a Circuit and Chairman of a District, he commanded the confidence and esteem of all who knew him. Elected Secretary of the Conference in 1875, he continued to hold the office for three successive years with marked ability. As a pastor, he was diligent and painstaking; as a preacher, emphatically an expositor: his exposition of the Epistles to the Romans and to the Hebrews shows how thoroughly he studied the word of God. He rendered good service to the Connexion by his valuable work on the "Constitution and Polity of Wesleyan Methodism," as well as by the revised and enlarged edition of "The Order and Form of Business of the District Synods." His indefatigable industry, his frugal and conscientious use of time, his beautiful simplicity of character, and his enthusiasm to do good, were truly admirable, while his pure-mindedness and transparent goodness were exhibited in the guilelessness of a blameless life. He had fervent piety, strong faith in God, a tender sympathy, a gentleman's courtesy, and a scholar's learning. His was a manhood of a high type, and he seemed always to live near to heaven. His lifelong devotion to the Church was crowned with a peaceful end. As the years passed his infirmities increased, but he retained his intellectual faculties unimpaired. never lost his interest in whatever concerned Methodism or the Church of Christ in general. His room was like a watch-tower. On Sundays he made special prayer for his brethren who were preaching, whilst he constantly looked with sympathy on the operations of all the missionary societies. His prolonged eventide was filled with a "kindly light." He sometimes remarked, "Old age brings weariness," but he was always humbly trustful, resigned, and full of hope. He longed for his departure, and amid the solemn stillness of the Lord's day he entered peacefully and without a struggle into the joy of his Lord.

(23) WILLIAM FIDDIAN MOULTON, M.A., D.D.: born at Leek, March 14, 1835. His father and grandfather were Methodist preachers, and he was brought up in the nurture of the Lord and in the best traditions of the Church. Educated at Woodhouse Grove School and Wesley College, Sheffield, his gentle, blameless, studious boyhood gave promise of future eminence. At the latter place, in May, 1852, he attained, after long seeking, the personal knowledge of salvation, yielding himself wholly and once for all to the service of Christ. He

had already displayed unusual mental powers. His career at the London University culminated in his winning in 1856 the gold medal in mathematics and natural philosophy; but from this time he made Scripture the mark of all his studies. After some years spent in tuition, he was called to the Ministry in 1858, and was appointed assistant tutor at Richmond The late revered Alfred Barrett and Benjamin Hellier, his earliest colleagues, exercised an enduring influence upon his character. In 1868 he became classical tutor at Richmond. He had already established a high reputation in biblical scholarship, and was engaged upon the translation of Winer's "Grammar of New Testament Greek," which he considerably enriched, rendering an indispensable service to students of the Greek Testament. His work in this field is unsurpassed in exactness, critical acumen, and fulness of research. He made several other valuable contributions to biblical exposition, although his jealous devotion to practical duties forbad much that it was in his heart to do. He was one of the Company of scholars engaged from 1870 to 1881 upon the revision of the English New Testament, taking an active share in its deliberations, and still more in the labours supplementary to this task; the last words that he wrote concerned the revised marginal references of the Bible, then nearly completed. services to the cause of sacred learning were recognised by his election into the Legal Conference in 1872, at the earliest possible age. The University of Edinburgh, in 1874, conferred upon him its Doctorate of Divinity; and three years later the University of Cambridge added the comparatively rare distinction of its honorary Master of Arts degree. For sixteen years he taught at Richmond, earning in the highest degree the esteem and gratitude of his many students. The principal work of his life was, however, the foundation of the Leys School at Cambridge, committed to his hands in 1874. It is difficult to estimate and impossible to record, the industry, care, and vigilance, the administrative skill and resource, the self-devotion and courage which he applied to this arduous undertaking. He

proved himself a Christian schoolmaster of the finest English type. Love and confidence gathered about him from all sides -in the Church, in the university, and most of all from his colleagues and the boys in the school. His abounding sympathy, his patient firmness and perfect temper, his genial tact and courtesy, his large-hearted wisdom, won for him a personal influence of the rarest and happiest kind, which was exerted with the best results in the building up of a great Methodist Other distinguished services Dr. Moulton public school. He took a deep interest in the rendered to the Church. development of the East Anglia District, and forwarded the work greatly by his counsel and practical aid. He assisted largely in the revision of the Hymn-book effected in 1876. From the year 1873 to his death he held the office of Secretary to the Committee for the examination of Preachers on Trial. greatly developing and improving the system of examination. to which he attached the utmost importance. In most of the Connexional movements and discussions of recent years he took a warm interest, exercising a modest but weighty influence that made for peace and mutual understanding. He occupied the Presidential chair of the Conference in 1890, with admirable efficiency, dignity, and grace, and commended himself to the affectionate reverence of all our people. His preaching was deeply expository and experimental, tender and faithful. He walked before God in a humility that deepened to the end, counting himself, though he had "done all these things," an "unprofitable servant," and relying with a constant and childlike faith on the merit of his Saviour, and in the "hope of eternal life, which God, who cannot lie, hath promised." end came with startling suddenness. A premonitory stroke had touched him, in the midst of excessive labours, some two years before. It was hoped that he had recovered; but on February 5, 1898, as he returned in the afternoon from visiting a sick friend, a second and fatal seizure supervened. moments the busy and watchful servant passed, without a sigh or the "sadness of farewell," to the presence of his Lord.

(24) THOMAS HULME: born at West Bromwich, on May 14, Blessed with a godly parentage, he was early the subject of deep religious impressions. In his fifteenth year he experienced a saving change of heart. Two years afterwards he began to preach, and for nearly sixty years this was his loved employ. In 1844 he was accepted as a Candidate, and sent to Didsbury College, where he spent two years. For forty-two years of active ministry he maintained a blameless reputation, being "an example of the believers, in word, in conversation, in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity." Gifted by nature with the charm of geniality, which was beautified by grace, he was a man greatly beloved. People were always attracted by his open and radiant countenance; but in the pulpit his face was all aglow, witnessing unmistakably to the warmth of his piety. In his sermons, which were carefully prepared, he delighted to enlarge on the grand evangelical verities, giving special prominence to the distinctive doctrines of Methodism. These he set forth lovingly and persuasively; and many will be "the crown of his rejoicing in the day of the Lord Jesus," While the sterner aspects of Christian truth were not neglected, he was pre-eminently "a son of consolation." As a pastor he greatly excelled, his unfailing cheerfulness, his tender sympathy, and his practical counsels making him an ever-welcome visitor to the houses of his people, especially the poor. His superintendency was painstaking, conscientious, and methodical. At the Conference of 1888 he became a Supernumerary, taking up his abode at Ryde, where he had previously laboured for three years. Here he continued to render valued service in the pulpit, the class-room, and other spheres, for nine years. last affliction was long and severe, but his sufferings were cheerfully borne, his only regret being that his work as a preacher was done. Had he lived a few weeks longer, he intended to celebrate the sixtieth anniversary of his pulpit work by preaching from his first text, Isaiah iii. 10. On the last day of consciousness he was asked, "Are you resting

on the atonement?" His reply was, "Yes, yes, hallelujah!" These were his last words. On Sunday, February 6, 1898, he calmly fell on sleep, in the seventy-seventh year of his age, and the fifty-second of his ministry.

(25) SAMUEL BROWN (B): born at Pilley, near Sheffield, September 18, 1821. Soon afterwards his parents removed to Thurgoland, in the Sheffield Ebenezer Circuit, where his early years were spent. Owing to the premature death of his father, his training devolved upon his mother, a pious and devoted Methodist. It was her custom to take with her to class each of her children when very young. The earnest desire of her heart for their conversion was realised in the case of her son. When only a lad he was accustomed, with some of his companions, to go the house of an old classleader, through whose instrumentality he was led to surrender himself to God. He immediately engaged in Christian work. and when seventeen years old began to preach. On October 17. 1845, he was ordained as missionary to the West Indies. spending sixteen years abroad. Returning to England in October, 1861, he entered the home work, and after thirty-one years of service in this country became a Supernumerary at Kingswood, where he lived for four years. His cultured and thoughtful ministry was greatly valued. He was wise in counsel, a faithful pastor, a true friend. The fragrance of his beautiful and attractive character was everywhere recognised -not least in the Circuit in which his years of retirement were spent, where his memory is cherished with reverence and affection. He had a clear judgment and a well-balanced mind. On the foreign field, as at home. his ministry was owned of God, and many will be his crown of rejoicing in the day of the Lord. At eventide there was light. He was calm in the prospect of departure. rejoicing in memories of hallowed service; at the same time he expressed a deep sense of his utter unworthiness,

repeating, when nearing the end, with humble satisfaction the words:

Rock of ages, cleft for me, Let me hide myself in Thee.

The end came on February 8, 1898, when in perfect peace he entered the rest of God.

- (26) HENRY BANKS: born at Darlaston, Staffordshire, October 7, 1817. His parents were zealous and consistent members of our Church, and from infancy he was surrounded by the gracious influences of a godly home. He early became the subject of strong spiritual impressions, and when about fourteen years of age was led to full decision for Christ. When nineteen he commenced to preach, and at the Conference of 1839 was accepted as a Candidate. Up to 1886 he continued in full Circuit work. His ministry was welcome and useful, and in many Circuits he witnessed great spiritual prosperity, conversions being frequent. His sermons were carefully prepared, full of teaching, and often most impressive. As a Superintendent, he was eminently careful and judicious, thoroughly understanding the business of the Church, and impartially administering its discipline. end, as became such a life, was beautiful. Being asked by the Superintendent of the Circuit whether he had any message to send the people, he said, "Tell them I die in the faith and hope of that gospel which I have preached to others." He passed peacefully away at Liskeard on February 9, 1898, in the eighty-first year of his age, and the fifty-eighth of his ministry.
- (27) Joseph Whitney: born at Yardley, Northamptonshire, October 19, 1851, and died at Teignmouth. In 1874 he was accepted as a Candidate, and after two years at Richmond was sent to Bengal. His missionary career of eight and a half years was divided between Calcutta and Barrackpur. His great desire was to be an efficient vernacular preacher, and in

this he succeeded by hard and patient toil. His knowledge of the language won for him a seat upon the Calcutta Revision Committee of the Bengali version of the New Testament. His health was early impaired through devotion to his work, but unfailing cheerfulness, zeal, and genius for method, enabled him to accomplish much. native Christians he was sincerely loved, and the native Ministry in Bengal is enriched by men whom he trained. Many others received from him the word of life. Through failure of health he was obliged to return to England, and it was with deep sorrow he learned that the condition of his health precluded his again labouring on the mission field. The remainder of his life was spent at Rheims, Brixham, and Teignmouth. As a preacher, he was direct and practical, and his ministry was owned of God. As a pastor, he was diligent and greatly beloved by young and old. The end came somewhat suddenly. His death was as beautiful as his life. this is dying," he said, "there is nothing to be afraid of." Death was "swallowed up of life." On the morning of February 16, 1898, after much suffering, borne with fortitude and patience, he passed away, with the shout of "Victory!" on his lips, in the forty-seventh year of his age, and the twentysecond of his ministry.

(28) Joseph Boulton: born at Nantwich, December 29, 1852. He attributed his early decision for Christ to his mother's prayers, and delighted to speak of his home as a sanctuary in which his spiritual life was strengthened. At the age of sixteen he began to preach. Five years later he went to Didsbury College, and after three happy years there entered upon Circuit life. His first Conference appointment was as District Missionary in the Cardiff and Swansea District, where many will be the "crown of his rejoicing." His preaching was marked by great plainness of speech, sound evangelical teaching, apt illustration, and a manifest desire to bring sinners to Christ. His sermons and addresses to the

young were especially attractive. As military chaplain, he rendered invaluable service. A guileless, unobtrusive, and saintly life endeared him to all. Testimonies to his great spiritual usefulness can be gathered from all his Circuits. At the Conference of 1806 he was appointed to Dover, where great success attended the first year's labours. Immediately after the Conference of 1897, however, his health became seriously impaired. For five months he struggled bravely against a painful disease, and the loving messages which he sent from his sick-bed to the congregations helped to deepen the spiritual life of many, particularly of the young. Shortly before his death, when the words "Jesus only" were repeated to him, his face lit up with a radiance always to be remembered by those present, and through intense suffering he said. "That was one of my first texts: I should so much like to preach from it again!" Then he added: "To-morrow is the first day of the week. The Lord's day. I shall go home on that day! Praise the Lord!" Before the sun rose on the Lord's day, February 27, 1898, he passed to his heavenly rest, in the forty-sixth year of his age, and the twenty-second of his ministry.

(29) FREDERICK H. THOMAS, son of the Rev. John Wesley Thomas: born at Wallington, August 14, 1844. In early life he decided for God, and at the age of twenty-five was accepted as a Candidate. For twenty-six years he laboured with much acceptance, his sermons being well prepared, interesting in style, and attractively delivered. The modesty of his disposition, the gentleness of his spirit, and his devotion to work attested the worth of his Christian character. For some years he struggled with impaired health, but bravely continued his work in the North Hill Circuit until overtaken by inflammation of the lungs, brought on by exposure to cold. He died peacefully on February 27, 1898, his last words being, "I have no fear; it is all right." Two of his latest texts were very significant: "I must work the works of Him that sent

Me, while it is day: the night cometh, when no man can work"; and, "Enoch walked with God: and he was not for God took him."

- (30) Thomas Dickin: born on November 6, 1832. The son of a Methodist preacher, he was converted while a scholar at Woodhouse Grove School. His spiritual awakening was followed by a period of great depression and disquietude, but he at length found pardon and peace, and ever after enjoyed the full assurance of the divine favour. A colleague once heard him say that "every year since his conversion had been brighter and better than the preceding one." He entered the Ministry in 1850, and in all his Circuits won affectionate esteem by the saintliness of his character and the ability and fidelity with which he devoted himself to his sacred work. laboured chiefly in country Circuits, and was for some years Financial Secretary of the Carlisle District. His preaching was especially valued by the more thoughtful and spirituallyminded of his hearers. His tastes were scholarly and refined. He read much, and possessed rich stores of knowledge. But his best powers were given to the study of the Scriptures, and he so preached as to feed the Church of God. His gentleness and kindness endeared him as a pastor, especially to the sick and poor. He was a wise, kind, yet firm Superintendent, and most brotherly and faithful as a colleague. At the Conference of 1896 he was compelled by failing health to become a Supernumerary, and settled at Boston Spa. Here, while able, he cheerfully gave occasional help in both pulpit and pastoral work. But weakness rapidly increased, though there was no wasting, painful disease; and on March 28, 1898, he passed peacefully from earth to heaven, in the sixty-sixth year of his age and the thirty-ninth of his ministry.
- (31) THOMAS TOWNSLEY DILKS: born of Methodist parents at Derby, in 1824. He dedicated himself to God in his boyhood, and entered the Ministry in 1847. From the

first a diligent student and expounder of God's word, his preaching was practical, fervent, faithful, exegetical, and evangelistic. In his earlier years he preached frequently in the open air to fishermen. While in the Isle of Man a remarkable revival was witnessed, which had a wonderful effect upon the whole town of Peel. His business abilities were remarkable. As Superintendent of important Circuits, as Financial Secretary, and as Chairman of a District, his practical views, ready tact, sound judgment, and administrative gifts were highly valued. A man of broad mind, wide sympathy, and progressive spirit, he was deeply interested in all that pertained to the moral and social welfare of men. A close student of national interests, he was careful not to introduce party politics into the Church. He took an earnest interest in the temperance cause, and, as a ready and effective platform speaker, often rendered great assistance to this and other movements of our times. In private life he was greatly beloved. His interest in nature and art, his ready wit, genial disposition, and godly spirit, made his company delightful. He was highly esteemed for his personal character. Of courteous manners and sunny temperament, he had a deep, ever-present sense of the reality and importance of spiritual things. He was in a more than ordinary degree a faithful and true man, a tender-hearted, sympathetic pastor, and greatly interested in children. In 1891, after forty-four years in the Ministry, he retired to Clapham, moving after three years to North Curry, in the Taunton Circuit. On Sunday, March 27, 1898, when about to preach from Philippians iv. 3, "Whose names are in the book of life," he was seized with illness, and soon after his removal from the pulpit passed away in great peace, in the seventy-fourth year of his age, and the fifty-first of his ministry.

(32) SAMUEL H. DUNSTAN: born at Helston, Cornwall, September 22, 1866. Converted during a special mission at Helston, he almost immediately began to exercise his gifts

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in preaching. The Conference of 1889 accepted him as a Candidate, and sent him to Handsworth College, where he spent three years in successful study, winning in a remarkable degree the affection of his fellow students. After two years on the Reserve List, he was stationed at Gunnislake, where he laboured with great acceptance. On his ordination he went to Lincoln (High Street), and there made many warm friends, his influence with young people and his aptitude in leading them to the Saviour being specially marked. His daily life was pervaded by a fervent and manly piety, and his genial spirit won upon all with whom he came into contact. He was devoted to his work, evangelical and acceptable in his preaching, and took special delight in his pastoral duties. In the midst of his work his health failed. was stationed at St. Columb in the hope that a milder climate would thoroughly restore him, but after a few weeks his health again broke down. During his illness he cherished an intense desire and hope soon to return to the work he loved so much; but his complaint assumed an acute form, and after a few days' unconsciousness he passed to his rest on April 9, 1898.

(33) WILLIAM WEST: born in London on March 9, 1811. His parents were not Methodists, but in his twentieth year he began to attend the Horseferry Road chapel, Westminster, where he gave himself to God. In 1832 he removed to Norwich, and there first met in class. In 1835 he became a Candidate for the Ministry in the Bungay Circuit. He had occupied the position of hired local preacher, and the Circuit asked that, in the event of his being accepted, he should be appointed to that Circuit as second minister. The Conference acceded to the request. His offer, however, had been general, and in one month from his settlement in the Circuit the Missionary Committee required him to fill a vacancy in the West Indies. He was ordained at Southwark on October 7, 1835, and four days later set sail for the Bahamas. He laboured

in the West Indies twenty-one years with great zeal and success, returning in 1856. The Conference had learned his worth as a missionary, and after one year in England he was appointed to the Gold Coast as Chairman and General Superintendent of three districts—the Gold Coast, Sierra Leone, and Gambia, which comprised the whole of our West African missions. His responsibility was heavy, and borne amid scenes of revolting cruelty. His work and the climate taxed his strength to the utmost. He returned in shattered health after fifteen vears' faithful service. During this illness he had nearly lost his sight. Within a few months his health was so far restored that at the request of the Missionary Committee he undertook a second journey to the West Indies. This was in 1872. The following year he became totally and permanently blind, but continued to preach and speak at missionary meetings so long as he had strength. He was well read in theology, and loyally attached to our doctrines and discipline. His gifts were of the practical order, his preaching clear and fervid. Even in advanced age he was most genial, and often even spritely. He was at once a man of holy aspiration and unbending integrity. His general conduct was marked by modesty, courtesy, and a broad and beautiful charity. During a quarter of a century he was sightless, but his spiritual vision was undimmed. He bore his affliction with exemplary patience and cheerfulness. "He rejoiced in hope of the glory of God." A few days prior to his death, in a last conversation with his friend the Rev. Joseph Dyson. he particularly and emphatically spoke of the mercy of God in Christ, quoting "not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to His mercy He saved us." He then repeated part of the hymn beginning

Now I have found the ground wherein,

and spoke of it as one of the most beautiful and precious in our collection, and as expressing his own constant experience. After a brief attack of bronchitis, he passed to his reward on the evening of Sunday, April 17, 1898, in the eighty-eighth year of his age and the sixty-third of his ministry.

(34) WILLIAM HENRY CORNFORTH: born at Sunderland, in 1810. His conversion to God was brought about in a remarkable manner. Engaged one day in a boating expedition on the river Wear, he watched a fight between two young men. In a month or two he was amazed to see the victor in the contest preaching in the streets of Sunderland with great energy. When the preacher told of his conversion, and exhorted his hearers to seek the mercy of God, young Cornforth vielded to this appeal, went to a meeting in a neighbouring Wesleyan chapel, and shortly afterwards joined the Society. The two young men, thus strangely brought together, were happily associated in Methodist work, and, later on, were both admitted into the Methodist Ministry. Mr. Cornforth's religious convictions were clear and deep, and from the outset he devoted himself with much ardour to the work of Christ. His robustness and force of character were beautifully blended with Christian courtesy. Although he had not the advantage of residence at the Theological Institution, his mental qualities, which were of a superior order, were cultivated by assiduous study. His sermons were thoughtful, scriptural, and edifying, expressed in strong, terse, and at times eloquent language, and delivered, even to the end of his course, with uncommon energy. The consciousness of his responsibility as a messenger of God was always mani-In some of his earlier Circuits his ministry was signalised by large ingatherings into the fold of Christ. He was diligent in pastoral work, and full of sympathy with the suffering and bereaved. As a ministerial colleague he was brotherly and genial. He was deeply versed in Methodist polity, and had marked capacity for administration. In three Districts he occupied the chair with great His home life was singularly beautiful. His efficiency. active ministry, extending over forty-three years, closed in 1884; but for a time he continued to preach as his strength permitted. During the last few years, spent at Nottingham, he was confined by physical weakness to his home, where "in quietness and assurance" he awaited the Master's call. Shortly before his death he said to a brother Minister: "I find such comfort in the precious words, 'Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on Thee.' Yes, peace, perfect peace. I am very feeble; but I say to myself many a time over the beautiful verse of Charles Wesley, 'In age and feebleness extreme,' etc." He entered into rest April 28, 1898.

(35) CHARLES HARRISON: born at Plymouth on April 22, 1848. He owed much to the influence of a godly mother and grandmother, who, while he was yet a boy, led him to accept the Lord as his Saviour. Among his papers has been found a document showing that at the age of sixteen he entered into a solemn covenant with God, dedicating himself absolutely to His service. At the age of seventeen he began to preach, and four years later became a student at Didsbury College, where he was known as a pattern of saintliness. used to spend three hours every day in devotional exercises. He possessed superior mental abilities, which by dint of diligent study he had trained and developed. He was a scholarly and cultured man, refined in tastes, intensely sympathetic in manner, conscientious and assiduous in the fulfilment of all his duties. In private life he was a pattern of kindness, unselfishness, and purity, beloved most by those who knew him most intimately. His sermons were fresh, thoughtful, chaste, and delivered with intense earnestness and great spiritual power. His devoutness of spirit and holiness of life were manifest in all his public utterances, as well as in social intercourse with his friends. As a pastor, he was most gentle and loving, ever ready to relieve the distressed, and highly beloved and revered by the people of his charge. As a colleague, he was affectionate, true, and trustful. He was loyal to the discipline and

usages of our Church, and sought in every department of work to be faithful, earnest, and fearless. He loved all beautiful things, and delighted supremely in the beauty of holiness, which he had received from above in an exceptional degree. At the end of April he was seized with pneumonia, and on May 4, 1898, he peacefully passed away. Not long before his death he pointed to a motto on the wall as expressing his experience: "Thou art near."

- (36) THOMAS WENN: born at Downham Market, Norfolk, in 1833. He was educated at a commercial school, and intended for the profession of an engineer. At the age of seventeen he was converted. He soon began to preach, and early attained popularity in his own and surrounding Circuits. He entered the Ministry in 1857, and quickly gave promise of great usefulness. A large portion of his ministerial life was spent in the west of England. He possessed a firm and intelligent grasp of Christian doctrine and a devout familiarity with the word of God. His preaching was clear and impressive in its exposition of divine truth, and had a singular charm for the thoughtful and reverent. He was in labours more abundant, delighting in pastoral visitation, and by tact, wisdom, and sympathy he secured the lasting esteem and affection of his people. He was well versed in the history and polity of Methodism. His Circuits were administered with great skill and efficiency. For many years he laboured under the disadvantage of enfeebled health, but almost to the last moment retained a strong love of life. He finally relinquished the active work of the Ministry in 1896. The closing months of his life were saddened by severe domestic bereavement. His end was peace; he fell asleep on May 9, 1898, in the sixty-fifth year of his age and the forty-first of his ministry.
- (37) HENRY W. J. SIDNELL (JONES): born at Bristol in 1851, and converted in early life. He was not brought

up in connexion with the Wesleyan Methodist Church, but having become convinced of its scriptural character, as illustrated by its spiritual helpfulness, he joined its communion. After working as a local preacher, he went to America and entered the Ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church. completing eight years of growingly acceptable and successful work in the United States. He returned to England, and in 1885 he was accepted by the British Conference. When he removed to Southport in 1897, his health was not vigorous: but it was hoped that the salubrious climate of the west coast would speedily restore him. That hope, however, was not fulfilled, and in December his strength failed so seriously that he was compelled to desist from the work he loved so well. His exposition of God's word was interesting and edifying. He delighted in proclaiming the great verities of the gospel; and whilst all classes found his ministry helpful and inspiring, young men especially derived great stimulus from it. As a pastor and friend, he won the esteem and affection of his people. As a colleague, he was altogether loyal and considerate. During his illness the grace of God was magnified in him. Sorely tried by the depressing affliction that gradually sapped his strength, he yet maintained his hopefulness and courage. When increasing weakness obliged him to contemplate at least a year of retirement, he told a dear personal friend: "It has been a hard battle, but I have won. Here, lying on this couch, I have fought it all out; and now, with calmness and confidence I can leave my changed prospects and my uncertain future in the hands of God without a murmur or regret." Shortly before the end came, he said: "Tell the people that what I have said to them from the pulpit and in the class-meeting is all true. The comfort, the assurance, and the hope of Jesus Christ are mine as I let all else go. It is all real now." And so, being "ready," he "fell on sleep," May 12, 1898, in the forty-eighth year of his age.

- (38) JOHN T. WADDY: born at Sheffield on April 29, 1836, the youngest son of the Rev. S. D. Waddy, D.D., and grandson of the Rev. Richard Waddy, who entered the Ministry in 1793. He was thus honoured to perpetuate a family succession of ministerial service which has lasted a hundred and five years, and which, happily, still continues. His childhood was hallowed by strong religious impressions, which early ripened into a definite act of self-surrender in Carver Street chapel. From that hour his zealous devotion to Christian service determined the whole course of his life. He was educated at Wesley College, where his father filled the office of governor. In 1850 he was accepted as a Candidate, and went to Dids-He possessed considerable natural gifts and bury College. a buoyant temper, combined with diligence and endurance. Earnest and conscientious, he was a laborious Minister and pastor, a trusty and steadfast friend. While broadly catholic in his sympathies, he was loyal to Methodism and to evan-His preaching was fresh, incisive, fervent, gelical faith. practical, and marked by an intense desire to save souls. was a lover of children and young people, and everywhere drew them about him-his last sermon in Dorchester being to the Boys' Brigade. Some signs of failing strength decided him to ask the May Synod to recommend his retirement as a Supernumerary at Conference. The request was made with deep feeling and very reluctantly. But God had designed for him an earlier rest. The end was most sudden. On Friday following the Synod week, as Vice-President of the Dorchester and District Free Church Council, he attended a social gathering, and took the part assigned him. A few minutes later he fainted, and before medical aid arrived he passed away, on May 20, 1898, in the sixty-third year of his age and the thirty-ninth of his ministry.
- (39) STEPHEN SUTTON: born at Hanley, January 8, 1841. He was converted to God when about fourteen years of age, and when twenty-two entered Richmond College. In 1866

he began his missionary service in Jamaica, where he remained till 1894. His brother missionaries bear witness that he discharged his duty fearlessly, and with a strong realisation of the sacredness of his task. He never spared himself, and was successful in promoting the varied work of the mission field. To this, whether it affected the inner life of the people or the material interests of the Church, he gave himself heartily. For twenty-eight years he laboured in some of the hardest Circuits of Jamaica with diligence, earnestness, fidelity, and success. The strain, however, of toil and exposure in a tropical climate began at last to tell seriously on his fine constitution, and in 1894 he returned to England. After two vears of Circuit life he retired from the active work of the Ministry, in the hope of resuming his beloved employment after twelve months' rest. During this year, although his health was never good, he still strove bravely to serve God and the Methodist Church, though in a position of less responsibility; but the hope of again taking his full share of ministerial service was reluctantly abandoned. At length, an attack of pleurisy and bronchial asthma, which involved long distress and suffering, utterly prostrated him. There was no faltering in his faith, and all who visited him were deeply moved as, with failing breath, he again and again declared his satisfied trust in the Master's will. He passed away on May 23, 1898, in the fifty-eighth year of his age and the thirty-third of his ministry.

(40) Mark Symons: born February 14, 1824, at St. Columb Minor. He was converted when twelve years of age. His first sermon was preached in a small country chapel in the Bodmin Circuit, from the text, "The Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost." After three years at Didsbury College he went to his first Circuit, St. Columb. He was forty-three years in the full work, and, though often in feeble health, was never known to neglect an appointment. No one could be more particular in looking after the villages.

He would walk many miles to preach to the smallest congregations, and he generally went early that he might visit the people. He was also instrumental in building many village chapels. A good business man and a capable administrator, he put his conscience into every detail of Circuit work, with the result that he left his Circuits in a prosperous condition. He was a man of peace. As a preacher, he was faithful, practical, loving, and earnest, and had the joy of seeing many souls brought to God. He excelled as a pastor. Wherever there was sickness or trouble he was sure to be found, and so gentle and sympathetic was his manner that his visits to the sick-room were greatly valued. He also took a deep interest in the young, and the children loved him. The last seven years of his life were spent in ever-increasing feebleness. Regretting greatly that he could do no more active work, he still continued to take the deepest interest in everything connected with Methodism. His last illness was very short. He was conscious to the end. On being asked, just before he died, whether he knew the Lord Jesus was leading him safely, "Yes, yes," was his eager, emphatic reply. He said little after this: but the testimony of his life was enough. He died on May 27, 1808, in the seventy-fifth year of his age and the fiftieth of his ministry.

(41) ARTHUR WILLIAM CLAPHAM: born at Cheetham Hill, Manchester, March 30, 1871. Brought up in a Christian home, where loyalty to God and man was the habit of daily life, he feared the Lord from his youth. He was educated at the Leys School, and early proved himself to be a patient and successful student. With a clear persuasion that he was called of God to the Christian Ministry, he gave himself right heartily to prepare for his life work. In 1894 he went to Headingley College, where he spent three years. His influence was always good. Refined, gentle, and full of kindness, he won the love and confidence alike of tutors and fellow students. He had learnt that the greatest luxury in life is to help others,

and that the highest ambition of the preacher is to win souls. So he laid up stores of knowledge for future use; but first and foremost he cultivated personal and habitual fellowship with God. At the Conference of 1897 he was placed on the President's List of Reserve, and was sent successively to Southsea, Huddersfield, and Barton-on-Humber. In each of these places, though his stay was short, he gained respect and affection by his self-sacrificing diligence, his helpful teaching, and his pastoral sympathy. Whilst in Huddersfield his health began to fail; but at Barton he still struggled on, despite his utter weakness. At length tired nature could hold out no more, and with the infinite calm of entire consecration to the Father's will, he passed to the higher service on Sunday June 5, 1898, in the twenty-eighth year of his age, and the first of his ministry.

(42) JOHN RICHARDS (B): born at Bulwell, near Nottingham, November 6, 1811; died at Finsbury Park, July 11, 1898. He entered the Ministry in 1836, and after two years at the Institution was appointed to Clarkebury in South Africa. For eleven years he remained in that country, labouring at Grahamstown, Pietermaritzburg, and other stations. In 1849 he returned to England, and for seven years was engaged in the home work. Then followed a further term of eleven years in the South African field, where his faithful and earnest service is still held in grateful remembrance. After two years more in English circuits, he went in 1869 to Calcutta, and for six years preached the gospel in that city. Though unable to use the Hindu vernacular, his sermons, delivered through an interpreter, were effective, and many testimonies are borne to his usefulness among the native population. For the last twenty years of his life he was a Supernumerary in the Finsbury Park Circuit. His old age was singularly beautiful. His saintly character, his evangelical fervour in preaching and public prayer, his visitation of the sick, attracted the veneration and love of all who knew him. His last illness was very brief.

Returning from Colston Bassett, the scene of his boyhood, which he had visited every summer for the last twenty-three years, he took a chill, and, after a few days' sickness, passed to his rest in the eighty-seventh year of his age and the sixty-second of his ministry.

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(43) JAMES R. BERRY: born of Methodist parents at Alton, Hants, on February 18, 1838. When thirteen years of age he was led to consecrate himself to Christ. Four years later he began to preach, and was accepted as a candidate for the Ministry by the Conference of 1858. After spending a year at Richmond he was ordained, and proceeded to Sierra Leone, where he laboured with much success for above three years. Returning to England in 1863, he soon took a good position, and travelled in some of our most important Circuits. He gave himself entirely to his work, being diligent in the discharge of all his duties, and seizing every opportunity of doing good both in public and private. He had a special interest in Foreign Missions, and as a lifelong abstainer took part in every kind of temperance work. His supreme aim was the salvation of souls. A thoughtful, earnest, and evangelical preacher, by his labours many were turned to righteousness. He was an ideal Superintendent, methodical, painstaking, hard-working, shrinking from no difficulty, and never sparing himself; generous and obliging to his colleagues, whom he ever treated with considerate kindness. In most of his circuits he knew personally all the members of the Societies under his special charge, and was diligent and faithful in the fulfilment of pastoral duties, his kind and sympathetic nature making his visits a blessing, especially to the sick. A very devout man, he lived near to God, his character, marked by integrity and strict conscientiousness, being without reproach. Blessed with good health, he took in hand everything with cheerful enthusiasm. He was hopefully looking forward to a period of increasing usefulness, when attacked by typhoid fever. During most of his illness he was delirious; but even in his mental wandering he was preaching, praying, and urging his imaginary hearers to consecrate themselves to God. He peacefully entered into rest on the morning of July 21, 1898, in the sixty-first year of his age and the thirty-ninth of his ministry.

(44) ROBERT NEWTON YOUNG, D.D.: born at Halifax, Nova Scotia, June 17, 1829. His father, the Rev. Robert Young, was an honoured missionary and eminently successful evangelist, who enjoyed the confidence of his brethren in a high degree, and, after returning to England, was raised to the Presidency of the Conference. His son, Robert Newton. was sent to Woodhouse Grove School, and afterwards to St. Saviour's Grammar School, Southwark. At the age of twelve the lad began to meet in class, but it was not till his nineteenth year that he entered upon a definite Christian experience. In 1850 he was accepted as a Candidate for our Ministry, and after a residence of three years as student and tutor at Richmond College he was appointed to a Circuit, and for twenty-four years travelled in our most important Circuits. The next twenty years of his life were devoted to teaching in Headingley and Handsworth Colleges. For fifteen years he held the post of Tutor in Biblical Literature, Exegesis, and Classics, discharging its responsible duties with diligence, fidelity, and success. In 1892 he became Tutor in Pastoral Theology and House Governor at Handsworth College, a position he held till the Conference of 1807, when, owing to failing health, he retired from active service. From 1881 to 1885 Dr. Young was Secretary of the Conference, and in 1886 he was elected to the Presidency, being the only President's son who has occupied the Chair. He rendered eminent service to his Church, and was held in high esteem by his brethren. He was a man of many gifts and accomplishments, a patient student, and an accurate scholar; conversant with affairs, and efficient in Circuit and

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Connexional administration. As a preacher, he was expository in method, finished in style, and effective in delivery. He was greatly appreciated by our people, while his general culture endeared him to many in other communions. It pleased God that a distressing affliction should mark the close of a long and brilliant career. But while He chastened His servant, He did not forsake him. Robert Newton Young died in the faith in which he had lived; and the memory of his reverent spirit, his faithful service, and his humble trust in the Saviour will be long and tenderly cherished by all who truly knew him. He died on August 1, 1898, in the seventieth year of his age and the forty-seventh of his ministry.

2. In Ireland, three:

(1) WILLIAM CROOK, D.D.: born at Newtownbarry on November 1, 1823, was the eldest son of the Rev. William Crook, who entered the Methodist Ministry in 1804, and was known for years as "the father of the Irish Conference." His mother was of French extraction, and probably belonged to one of the Huguenot families who sought refuge in Ireland . from Roman Catholic persecution. She is described as a woman of remarkable gifts and acquirements, and there can be little doubt that her eldest son inherited from her the vivacity of spirit which made him a most enjoyable companion. The godly influences by which he was surrounded from childhood had their due share in moulding his general character; and at the age of fifteen he was brought to religious decision during a revival in Tullamore, when the Rev. William Cather was in that Circuit. In a few years he became a local preacher, and in 1846 was accepted as a Candidate and sent to the Theological Institution at Didsbury. In 1848 he received his first appointment, and thus was nearly fifty years in the itinerancy, during which he laboured with great success and acceptance. In 1850 he threw himself with characteristic

ardour into the work of the great revival in Ulster, and, feeling the need of a journal fully devoted to the cause of evangelical religion, he originated the Irish Evangelist. The present generation scarcely realises how much it is indebted to him and those who aided and encouraged him in this spirited undertaking. He wrote an excellent biography of his father, rendered increasingly interesting by valuable and racy notices of contemporary Methodism, and also published a volume entitled, "Ireland and the Centenary of American Methodism." He always held a high place in the affection and confidence of his brethren, and received from them many expressions of their esteem, in his election as Chairman of the Districts in which he was stationed, representative to the British Conference, delegate to the London Œcumenical Conference, member of the Legal Conference, and twice Vice-President of the Irish Conference. These honours were well deserved and honourably sustained. In the preparation and adoption of our present system of lay representation, and in the negotiations which resulted in the union of the two principal Methodist bodies in Ireland, he took a leading part. As almost the originator, and as the first secretary and one of the treasurers of the Orphan Society, he rendered most valuable service. As a preacher, he excelled in careful analysis of his text, accurate generalisation of the truth which it embodied, forcible and attractive putting of the main points of his subject, and appropriate illustration. debater, he was fertile in resource, clear in argument, and indomitable in perseverance. He was a popular lecturer, and throughout life a consistent and earnest advocate of the cause of temperance. He had wide acquaintance with general literature. With his extensive theological reading, keen perception, able powers of reasoning, and thorough relish for discussion, he possessed all the elements of a powerful religious controversialist. Although a loyal Methodist, he had warm sympathy for other Churches. He was endowed with a remarkably sanguine temperament, so that he was an utter

sleep."

(2) JAMES HARPUR: born at Anahone, in County Fermanagh, on April 10, 1857. At the age of sixteen he was led to decision for Christ under the ministry of the Rev. James Carson, then Superintendent of the Clones Circuit, Immediately after his conversion he began to preach Christ in the farmhouses and schoolrooms of his own neighbourhead. The Lord used him in leading sinners to the Saviour. and soon a passion for soul-saving grew upon him. At this time he was recognised as a talented and promising youth, and the call of the Spirit was followed by the call of the Church. Endowed with good natural ability, he applied himself diligently to study, and at the Conference of 1875, when only eighteen years of age, he was accepted as a Candidate, and received his first appointment to Donegall Place Circuit, Belfast, where he remained for two years, and was greatly owned of God. For eight years following he laboured with great acceptance and zeal in some of the largest country Circuits, and then returned to Belfast, where he remained for twelve consecutive years as Superintendent of various Circuits, in each of which his ministry was effective in attracting large congregations, and fruitful in the salvation of souls. He was an earnest and faithful preacher, a vigorous and popular lecturer, a kind and sympathetic pastor; but his crowning gift was that of the evangelist. As a soul-

winner he was eminently successful, and in all his Circuits God honoured him in leading sinners to Christ. As a Superintendent, he was judicious and painstaking, as a colleague, loyal and affectionate, and as a friend, true as steel. His bright and happy disposition made him a great favourite in social circles, where he always brought with him the sunshine of a loving heart that sought to make every one happy. He was the trusted friend of the young. and for them he possessed special attraction, winning by his genial smile and manifest sympathy both their confidence and love. The disease which eventually proved fatal began to develop seven years ago; but, notwithstanding this, he attended to his ministerial duties with cheerfulness and zeal, and bore his sufferings with patience. At the last Conference he was appointed to Holywood, with the hope that sea air and quiet work would restore his strength; but about the month of October he was compelled to give up work altogether. Everything that skill and love could suggest was done to lengthen his valuable life, but in vain. The call came suddenly, yet not too soon. He was ready. and had no fear of death. The Saviour he preached to others was precious to him in his dying moments. The last scene was touching and triumphant. His window faced the south. and the light flooded his room. Some one remarked, "What beautiful sunshine!" "Yes," said he; "but it's nothing like the sunshine of Christ's love that fills my soul," Then, having spoken of the preciousness of Christ, he calmly closed his eyes and whispered, "Till the shadows flee away," and with these words on the lips his happy spirit passed into the immediate presence of angels and of God. He was called to his reward on January 25, 1898, in the forty-first year of his age and the twenty-third of his ministry. Into his brief life he crowded much work for God and man.

(3) Andrew Armstrong: born at Plymouth on January 31, 1830. In youth he removed to Ireland, where, during an

extensive revival of religion in the winter of 1843-4, in the Enniskillen Circuit, he was savingly converted, with at least three other brethren now in the ranks of our Ministry, and a host of others who have done important work for Christ as local preachers, class-leaders, and officers of our Church. In 1855 he was received on trial as a Candidate for our Ministry, and entered upon a career of earnest, laborious, and successful work. He laboured in many of our leading Circuits. In several of them, especially in the Westport and Ormeau Road Circuits, there were blessed revivals. Mr. Armstrong was for many years Secretary of the Temperance Committee, in connexion with which he did much to promote the cause of total abstinence in this country. He also took a deep interest in our trust property, and was identified with the erection and the improvement of several of our chapels and ministers' residences. He was an able and faithful preacher of the glorious gospel of the grace of God, and a diligent pastor who took a deep interest in the young, and by his personal qualities of mind and heart secured the affections of the people under his care. He also endeared himself to his brethren, and received many expressions of their confidence, especially in being elected to the offices of Secretary and Chairman of his Districts. In the spring of 1806 his health gave way; but at the following Conference it was so far restored that he was reappointed to the Limerick Circuit. Soon, however, he again fell ill, so that he was not able to resume his work. From that time slowly and steadily the tide of life ebbed, and he calmly and confidently awaited his appointed end. abundantly blessed in his retirement by the consolations of the Holy Spirit, so that it was a source of great joy and spiritual benefit to visit him. His mind continued vigorous, and his interest in God's work was unabated. He anticipated with pleasure the proceedings of the Irish Conference, and sent a message of love to his brethren. On Tuesday, June 21, 1898, in the sixty-ninth year of his age, and at the close of the forty-third year of his ministry, his ransomed spirit took its

last triumphant flight From Calvary's to Zion's height.

3. In our Foreign Missions, seven:

(1) HENRY HARE DUGMORE: born in Birmingham, April 27, 1810. Whilst a child he went to South Africa with his parents, who formed part of the company of British settlers of 1820, under the pastoral care of the Rev. William Shaw. He was converted to God on New Year's Day, 1831. and entered the Ministry three years afterwards. His first appointment was to the Mount Coke mission station; but owing to the Kafir war of 1835 he was soon compelled to leave. During his stay at Mount Coke he mastered the Kafir language, being able to preach in it within six months after his arrival. The almost perfect command which he obtained of this language made his sermons a means of profit and delight to his hearers, whilst it enabled him to render undying service to our mission work in South Africa by the translation of the Psalms and gospels, besides a great part of the Prayer-book. His poetic gifts also were called into exercise in the production of over a hundred Kafir hymns, which form more than onethird of the South African vernacular hymn-book. His active ministry extended over a period of forty-two years, including two visits to England. In all his Circuits he was honoured and revered; and his preaching, which was of a very high order, was made a means of profit and blessing to hundreds. At the same time he took a keen interest in everything that related to the moral and social welfare of the people, giving freely of his time, service, and money for the promotion of every good cause. From the time of his conversion he became a great reader, and continued to delight in books to the close of his life. He began the study of German after he was

seventy years of age. He was a gifted musician, and his acquaintance with the works of the great composers was remarkable. As a preacher, he was wonderfully clear in his expositions of divine truth, setting forth the great doctrines of Scripture in all their fulness and saving power, whilst much spiritual influence often accompanied his ministry. Nor were his prayers less noteworthy, as numbers who have been melted and uplifted by them have testified. In 1876 he became a Supernumerary, and took up his residence in Queenstown, which henceforth became his home until his death, on June 14, 1897, in his eighty-eighth year. Up to within a year or two of the end he continued to preach and visit the people, especially the sick and troubled. Even after he became blind he conducted public services, repeating from memory the hymns and Scripture lessons. All fear of death was removed, and at times his soul was filled with joyful anticipation of the glory awaiting him, and of the near prospect of being with Christ. He had a profound sense of God's holiness, and of the imperfections of his own life. His only plea was the finished work of the Redeemer. After lingering for some time in extreme weakness, he gradually sank into unconsciousness, until mortality was "swallowed up of life."

(2) SAMUEL EVANS ROWE: born at Midsomer Norton, in Somerset, September 2, 1834. He was the son of the Rev. Samuel Rowe, and was educated at Woodhouse Grove. After a few years spent partly in business and partly in teaching he began to preach. In 1857 he was accepted as a Candidate for the Ministry, and entered Didsbury College, but had to leave almost immediately to take his first appointment. Possessed of superior mental powers, he rapidly rose to a position of influence in our Ministry. After he had been Secretary of influence in our Ministry. After he had been Secretary of the Copposal District for three years, he was included appointed Chairman of the Exeter District. When at Clapton the was requested by the Missionary Committee

to go to South Africa, and in 1880 was appointed to Pietermaritzburg, where he laboured for thirteen years with much acceptance. Later he spent two years in the native work, and in 1805 was appointed to the Harrismith (English) Circuit. In 1886 he was elected Chairman of the Natal District. which position he held till 1895. In 1890 he was President of the South African Conference. In 1896 he received permission to visit England for a year, and was appointed one of the representatives of the South African Conference to the Yearly Conference, at which he was elected a member of the Legal Conference, an honour which he was permitted to enjoy for a very brief period. As a preacher, he possessed the expository gift in a high degree. He was a lucid reasoner, and exact in his choice of words. His sermons were evangelical, full of point, suggestive, and original, and were often attended with mighty spiritual power. As Superintendent of a Circuit, he was judicious and capable; as a pastor, he was tender and sympathetic, especially in cases of sickness and bereavement; as a colleague, he was frank and brotherly; as a friend, he was pre-eminently faithful. In the official positions to which he was appointed from time to time, he justified the choice of the Conference by the manner in which he performed his work. As President, he discharged the duties devolving upon him with great ability: as Chairman, he was impartial and kind; highly esteemed and trusted, he had the joy of seeing the District flourish during his term He took a great interest in native work, and was regarded with affection and confidence by the native people. Throughout the whole District his loss was sincerely regretted, and most of all by those who knew him best. He took a leading part in the legislation and general business of the South African Conference. His intimate knowledge of the laws and usages of Methodism in England enabled him to render, in various ways, invaluable service. His death came unexpectedly. Whilst returning to resume his duties in South Africa he was seized with paralysis on

July 2, 1897, and two days later, when still on board the *Tantallon Castle*, which was lying in Algoa Bay, he fell on sleep, in the sixty-third year of his age and the fortieth of his ministry.

- (3) WILLIAM CLIFFORD HOLDEN: who spent more than sixty years in the Ministry. He was a native of Derbyshire, and whilst a youth sought and found the Lord. conversion was clear, and he lived in the daily consciousness of the Lord's abiding presence. He was in due time accepted for the Methodist Ministry. After three years' service he went out to Cape Colony in 1839, and early manifested those characteristics which marked his career. He was untiring in his industry, and by unremitting application made himself familiar with the history and customs of the native races. His work on the Kafir tribes has taken its place as a standard authority. Faithful in the discharge of his duties as a Minister, he carried the gospel of Christ into new spheres, which at a later date became prosperous Methodist He was the pioneer of Methodism in Natal. Churches. diligent student of Scripture, his sermons were marked by evangelical and spiritual fervour. As a pastor, he was unwearying in his care of the flock. Those who lived on lonely and remote farms were as carefully visited as the residents in town. During the years of retirement he was still diligent, and up to the time of his last illness, which was of brief duration, he was one of the chaplains of the Chronic Sick Hospital, Grahamstown, devoting most of his time to the spiritual well-being of its inmates. He passed peacefully and triumphantly away on October 14, 1897, in the eighty-fourth year of his age and the sixty-second of his ministry.
- (4) JOHN ROBERT ROLSTON: born some sixty years ago, in an Indian Christian home. When a young man he was under arms as a volunteer in the Residency at Lucknow during the

Mutiny of 1857, and was commended to government for his services. He qualified as a dispensing chemist, and was savingly converted to God through the influence of the godly medical officer with whom he worked. He received the call to preach the gospel twenty-four years ago, and worked for many years as an evangelist in our mission. He was accepted as a Candidate for our Ministry in 1882, and was ordained in 1886. He found the sphere of service for which he was best suited at Akbarpur, in the Fyzabad Circuit, where he was stationed for the last nine years of his ministry. During the terrible famine through which India passed last year, Mr. Rolston was very active in caring for the poor and destitute, and was moved to undertake the Christ-like work of rescuing and training orphans and caring for poor widows. In the midst of his beneficent and Christ-like plans he suddenly received the message, "The Master is come and calleth for thee." He was attacked by palpitation of the heart in the evening of December 15, 1897, and, in spite of medical aid, passed away the following day. His place will be hard to fill. He was wise, cautious, faithful, strong; a man of large heart, tender sympathies, high principles, outspoken even to bluntness, but honest and true to the core. In him the Church militant loses a tried and worthy old warrior.

(5) Wojuade Ogunfumi Dosumu: born at Lagos, West Africa, in 1865. He was brought up in heathenism till he was twelve years of age. At that time, his father, the late king Dosumu of Lagos, placed him, with two of his brothers, under the care of the Rev. John Milum, then Chairman ot the District. When the Boys' High School opened in 1878, he was one of its first students: he was earnest, and gave evidence of superior mental gifts. His Christian surroundings and teaching produced an excellent effect upon his character, and during a series of evangelistic services, held in 1882, he boldly decided for Christ. He was sent, in 1885, as a

teacher to Ogbe, Abeokuta. After six years' efficient service there he was put in charge of one of the stations in the Lagos Circuit. At the Synod of January, 1897, he passed his examination as a Candidate for our Ministry, and was appointed to the Obun Eko church in Lagos. With devoted earnestness he entered on the work, and his friends anticipated for him a successful and distinguished career. But these hopes were to remain unfulfilled, for, during a severe attack of smallpox, he was suddenly, on March 22, 1898, called to the higher service of the Church triumphant, in the thirty-third year of his age and the first of his ministry.

- (6) ALEXANDER EZRA, the son of one of the early Brahman converts of our Mysore Mission: born in 1854. He was educated in the schools of the mission, and gave indications of considerable mental ability. He became conscious of acceptance with Christ through reading Bonar's tract entitled "The Way of Peace." He had special qualifications for literary work, and rendered much useful service in the preparation of Kanarese Christian literature. He died, after a short illness, on March 27, 1898.
- (7) NIBARON CHANDRA CHATTERJI: a native of Taltala, Calcutta, and a convert from Brahmanism. Living near our mission school in Taltala, he was brought under the influence of Christianity while quite a lad. In 1870, when only sixteen years old, he was baptized by the Rev. John Richards, and after a period of training he was employed by our mission, first as a village school teacher and afterwards as a catechist. In 1886 he was received as a Probationer for the Ministry, and for twelve years he laboured in different parts of Bengal as an evangelist and pastor. Several years ago his health seriously failed, and he never recovered his vigour. Shortly after the last Synod his health failed rapidly, and at Barrackpur, on May 8, 1898, he peacefully fell asleep. Brother Chatterji possessed good natural gifts, and if health had been given

him would have made a vigorous evangelist; but sickness seriously interfered with the success of his ministry. His work ceased when he should have been in the prime of life.

The obituaries of William Tyson and Luigi Capellini will appear next year.

Q. IX. How are our Ministers and Preachers on Trial stationed for the ensuing year?

A. As follows:

- [N.B.—1. Each of the places mentioned in these Stations, and numbered consecutively from 1 to 946, is the head of the Circuit; and the Minister first named is the Superintendent. In the event of his death, resignation, or incapacity, the Minister next named, provided such Minister be in Full Connexion with the Conference, and in full work, is the Superintendent. In case there is no Minister in Full Connexion with the Conference, and in full work, appointed to or remaining in the Circuit, the Chairman of the District is the Superintendent.
- 2. The Superintendent and other Minister or Ministers who are or shall be stationed in or appointed to the several Circuits undermentioned is and are appointed by the Conference to preach and to perform all acts of religious worship and Methodist discipline in each and every one of the Wesleyan Methodist chapels already erected, or to be erected, in each Circuit respectively, within the space of twelve kalendar months, at such time or times, and in such manner, as to him or them shall seem proper; subject, nevertheless, to the Superintendent Minister.
- 3. The Minister appointed to any Station without a number is the Superintendent, and is therefore entitled to preside in the Quarterly Meeting and Trustees' Meetings; but he shall, as heretofore, act under the direction of the Chairman of the District.

Q. XI. Whom do we appoint to be our Delegate in Ireland?

- A. Our President, the Rev. Hugh Price Hughes, M.A.; or, in his unavoidable absence, one of the following Ministers: the Rev. William L. Watkinson, Ex-President; the Rev. R. Crawford Johnson, D.D., nominated by the Irish Conference; the Rev. Marshall Randles, D.D., or the Rev. David J. Waller, D.D.
- N.B.—1. The PRESIDENT, or other Minister acting as Delegate under the authority of the preceding appointment, who shall preside at the next Conference in Ireland, shall exercise the powers confided to him under and by virtue of the thirteenth clause of Mr. Wesley's Deed Poll, dated February 28, 1784.
- 2. The Ex-President, the Rev. WILLIAM L. WATKINSON, the Rev. Henry J. Pope, D.D., and the Rev. WILLIAM D. WALTERS, are appointed to accompany the President to the Conference in Ireland which will commence in Dublin on Wednesday, June 21, 1899.

Q. XII. What other Official Appointments are made?

- A. (A) I. The Rev. ONÉSIME PRUNIER, B.A., B.D., is appointed the President of the next French Conference, to be held at Nimes, in the month of June, 1899.
- 2. The Rev. WILLIAM WYNNE is appointed the President of the next South African Conference, to be held at East London, in the month of April, 1899.
- 3. The Rev. W. CLARKE MURRAY, D.D., is appointed the President of the next General West Indian Conference, to be held in Jamaica in the spring of 1909.

- (B) I. The PRESIDENT of the Conference will preside at the Annual Meeting of the Welsh Wesleyan Methodist Assembly of Wales, to be held at Machynlleth in June, 1899. The Rev. Henry J. Pope, D.D., the Rev. T. Bowman Stephenson, LLD, and the Rev. John Hornabrook are appointed to accompany the President.
- 2. The Rev. WILLIAM L. WATKINSON, Ex-President, is appointed to attend the Annual Meeting of the Isle of Man District Synod, to be held at Castletown in the spring of 1899.

EXAMINATIONS OF CANDIDATES FOR ORDINATION.

Q. XIII. What are the Directions of the Conference respecting the Examinations of Candidates for Ordination?

IN THE SYNOD.

- A. (A) 1. Before any Preacher, having travelled four years, is recommended by his District Synod for admission into Full Connexion, he shall undergo a careful oral examination, by the Chairman of that Synod, respecting his acquaintance with Wesley's Works in general, and especially with his Sermons and his Notes on the New Testament. This oral Examination may be omitted when the report on the Probationer's paper on Wesley's Works (see p. 226) is satisfactory.
- 2. Every such Preacher shall also be examined as to his knowledge of the Constitution of Methodism and the Administration of Circuits; and as to whether, after four years' experience of its working, he still approves of our Discipline.

IN THE CONFERENCE.

- (B) I. Arrangements shall be made for conducting the Examination, in the Conference, of Candidates for Ordination at a time when the President of the Conference can attend, and when a large proportion of the Conference, including its official members, may be expected to be present.
- 2. An explicit declaration of his belief in the Doctrines of Methodism shall be required of each Candidate,

EXAMINATION OF PREACHERS ON TRIAL.

- Q. XIV. What is the Report upon the Examination of Preachers on Trial for the past year? And what are the directions of the Conference respecting the Examination of Preachers on Trial for the ensuing year?
- A. I. The following is a summary of the Report upon the Examination of Preachers on Trial.

The late Rev. Dr. Moulton.

This Committee cannot present its Annual Report without expressing its deep sorrow and heavy sense of bereavement under the loss sustained through the sudden removal by death of the Rev. William F. Moulton, M.A., D.D. For twenty-four years Dr. Moulton held the office of Secretary to the Committee, and the brain-burden of both the general direction and the detailed administration of its affairs devolved upon him. Our system of Examination for Preachers on Trial, in its present scope and character, has been developed by his wise and fostering care. To the labours of this department he devoted, in full measure, for this long period of time, his unique learning and skill, his patience and resolution, his unfailing tact and sympathy, his extraordinary powers of application, with a result for which the Conference, and especially its younger ministers, who by this means came under Dr. Moulton's influence, owe devout thanksgivings to the God of all grace and wisdom. The Conference feels with the Committee, that the work shaped by Dr. Moulton's hands is a sacred trust, and that no effort must be spared to maintain the standard of efficiency which he has set before us.

According to the appointment of the Conference, the Examination was held on December 3, 1897, and March 31, 1898. Some Fourth Year papers had to be taken on March 30.

Further relief has been given to the Probationers by the new regulation adopted by the Conference of 1897, which

allows them the option between the "advanced" and the "easier" papers in Greek and Hebrew. The Committee is glad to report that whereas seven Probationers, returned by their Tutors as unequal to the higher paper, nevertheless volunteered for it, only five took the reverse course. of these five had to sacrifice honours in consequence, as, in spite of their taking the lower paper, their marks did not attain the standard. The advantage now allowed to those who take the "advanced" Hebrew paper has borne fruit in . the further enlargement of the First Class in the Honours List, which rises from thirteen to eighteen. The whole list contains ninety-four names, compared with ninety-nine in 1897 and seventy-six in 1806. On the other hand, there were twenty-one cases of failure to be re-examined before the Synods met, compared with a total of sixteen last year. The number of postponed papers again shows a welcome diminution, from thirty-eight to twenty-nine. Almost all of these were cases of health, in which a medical certificate was obtained; and in all cases the sanction of the Chairman and the Superintendent was duly given. The whole of the work was reported to the Synods. There were three other papers reported specially to the Conference by direction of the Synods, which have in two cases attached this condition to their recommendation for full connexion.

In ten cases the full number of papers has not been taken Three Fourth Year Probationers who are not Candidates for Ordination have been allowed to complete their examination next year. Two have been laid aside altogether throughout the year. Two who returned invalided from foreign work take three subjects and one, respectively. Three, who were to have taken at the end of April subjects postponed on the ground of health, were still too unwell to sit for examination, and were necessarily excused for the year.

The results for the optional Greek Testament subject (iii. a) and the advanced Hebrew (iv. a) are necessarily given separately, since in estimating Honours or Failure the marks

The Mark 5 is now defined as implying a minimum of thirty r cent of the full credit obtainable on a paper. In subjects a and iv. a (where 7 counts as 5, a pass mark) a really worthless paper would, of course, be marked as below 7.

The general results of the examination of the Probationers of each year are as follows:

FIRST YEAR.—45 Probationers were examined, who wrote 168 papers, the valuation marks of which are as follows: i*, 2; i, 15; ii, 29; iii, 50; iv, 49; v, 21; vi, 1; vii, 1; Failure, o.

SECOND YEAR.—51 Probationers were examined, who wrote 199 papers, the valuation marks of which are as follows: i*, 7; i, 14; ii, 29; iii, 41; iv, 71; v, 33; vi, 3; vii, 1; Failure, o.

Third Year.—52 Probationers were examined, who wrote 203 papers, the valuation marks of which are as follows: i*, 5; i, 13; ii, 35; iii, 33; iv, 52; v, 52; vi, 11; vii, 1; Failure, 1.

FOURTH YEAR.—48 Probationers were examined, who wrote 229 papers, the valuation marks of which are as follows:

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i*, 1; i, 25; ii, 49; iii, 71; iv, 52; v, 25; vi, 3; vii, 2; Failure, 1.

The average marks obtained by the examinees, as compared with those of 1897, are as follows:

First Year.—1897: Papers valued 4, 30%; above 4, 53%; below 4, 17%.—1898: Papers valued 4, 29%; above 4, 57%; below 4, 14%.

Second Year.—1897: Papers valued 4, 24%; above 4, 66%; below 4, 10%.—1898: Papers valued 4, 36%; above 4, 46%; below 4, 18%.

Third Year.—1897: Papers valued 4, 29%; above 4, 53%; below 4, 18%.—1898: Papers valued 4, 26%; above 4, 42%; below 4, 32%.

FOURTH YEAR.—1897: Papers valued 4, 23%; above 4, 69%; below 4, 8%.—1898: Papers valued 4, 23%; above 4, 64%; below 4, 13%.

Special examinations were also arranged for T. H. Williams, A. T. Burbridge, B.A., and W. F. Lofthouse, M.A. Their marks in their special subjects are as follows:

T. H. Williams: 1 John and 1 Peter, English, 5.

A. T. Burbridge: Paley's Evidences, 2; St. Luke in Greek (special), 1*.

W. F. Lofthouse: Origen, De Principiis, Books ii. and iii., 1*; Bigg, Christian Platonists, 1.

Thomas Proudlove, who enters on his Probation in 1898, not having been to the Institution, was examined in two subjects. In Findlay's Epistles of St. Paul he obtained 3; in Banks's Manual of Christian Doctrine, 5.

A place in the Honours List is assigned to those who take the full number of subjects required, and in other respects fulfil the conditions of the Examination as laid down in the *Minutes of Conference*, and who obtain an average mark not exceeding 3 for the subjects taken in the Examination. In the First Class are placed those whose average mark does not exceed 1; in the Second Class those who have an average of between 1 and 2; in the Third Class those who have an average of between 2 and 3.

The names in each year stand in the order of merit; but, on account of the difference in subjects, no attempt is made to compare one year with another. In Greek and Hebrew there are two Papers—an easier and a more difficult. It is plain that it would not be fair to classify together those who took the easier and those who took the harder Papers, without distinguishing them by discriminating marks. - 2. GENERAL REGULATIONS.—(1) The Examination of Preachers on Trial shall be conducted by a Connexional Board of Examiners, to consist of one Examiner in each subject contained in the course of reading prescribed for the four years of probation.
- (2) In addition to the Probationers' Examination Committee, three General Examination Secretaries shall be appointed.

(4) At the September District Synod a District Probationers' Examination Secretary shall be appointed, with Assistant Secretaries if necessary, so as to provide a Secretary to take charge of each Central Examination in the District; and each Secretary shall be held responsible for the efficient conduct of the Central Examination. Where the distances allow, at least two Probationers shall be examined at each centre. The Secretaries for adjoining Districts shall confer before the end of September, with a view to fixing suitable centres for the Examination of Probationers stationed near the borders of the Districts. Full and clear instructions as to the course to be pursued shall be forwarded to the Secretaries by the General Secretaries.

- (5) The Examination shall be held in two parts, the first in the month preceding Christmas, the second in the spring; and it shall take place throughout the Connexion on the same days, which shall be fixed from year to year.
- (6) The Examination Papers, prepared under the direction of the Committee, shall be sent by the General Secretaries to

each District Examination Secretary, whose duty it shall be to distribute them at the Central Examination, and by the earliest post transmit to the General Secretaries the Papers written by the several Probationers at those Examinations.

(7) The Probationers' Papers shall be forwarded by the General Secretaries to the Examiners for valuation, and each Examiner shall send to them the results of his valuation of the Papers shown by numbers, together with such remarks upon them as he may think desirable.

In the case of the North and South Wales Districts, such variations from the foregoing arrangements are permitted as the Examination Secretaries may find necessary.

- (8) The General Secretaries shall compile from the returns of the Examiners a complete Report upon the examination of each Probationer, and forward it to the District Examination Secretary, to be presented by him to the May District Synod, together with such remarks on the Examination of the Preachers on Trial in the District as he may think desirable. The numbers obtained by each Preacher on Trial in the several subjects of Examination shall be entered on the Minutes of the District Synod. The Resolutions of the District Synods on the Examination of Preachers on Trial shall be forwarded to the General Secretaries by the District Examination Secretaries.
- (9) The Conference directs the General Examination Secretaries to send, in May, to each District Synod having one or more Candidates for Ordination, a Report showing the result of the Examination of every such Candidate during each year of his probation.
- (10) The General Secretaries shall prepare and present to the Conference a General Report upon the Examination of the Preachers on Trial.

- 7. The Conference requires every Probationer who is acquainted with Greek and Hebrew to take the Greek and Hebrew subjects which are specified in the list of subjects for his year. Every Probationer who has been a Student in the Theological Institution shall be examined in these Greek and Hebrew subjects, unless the Tutors under whom he studied, having taken into consideration his attainments on leaving the Institution, are of opinion that these examinations cannot reasonably be required in his case. In each year two Greek and two Hebrew papers shall be provided, of different degrees of difficulty; and, not later than October 1 in each year, the Committee shall decide, on the recommendation of the Tutors. what Probationers cannot reasonably be expected to take the more difficult papers. If other Probationers wish to take the easier paper in Greek or Hebrew, they shall be at liberty to do so, but will thereby become ineligible for Honours. the case of Hebrew, the subject set for the easier paper shall be specially selected to suit the acquirements of elementary Those who take the advanced paper shall receive students. special recognition in the Report of the Examination.
- 8. The subject marked iii, in the list for each year may be taken either in Greek or in English by those Probationers who, in the portions of the Greek Testament prescribed for their respective years, take the advanced papers. All who take the subject in Greek shall receive special recognition in the Report of the Examination.
- q. The Conference requires every Probationer of the First. Second, and Third Years respectively to be examined in the four subjects set for his year.
- 10. Probationers of the Fourth Year, and all Candidates for Ordination, shall take in March a paper on portions of Wesley's Works, to be chosen from year to year. Every Probationer of the Fourth Year shall be examined also in the subjects marked i., ii., iii., and iv., in the subjects for his year.
- 11. Whenever a Probationer obtains a lower grade than 5 (see p. 219) for any paper, representing a minimum of thirty

per cent of the full credit obtainable, he shall be re-examined in the same subject, and the results of both Examinations shall be specially reported to the Conference. In the Examinations on the Hebrew Bible and Greek Testament, questions on points of grammar shall form an essential part of every paper set.

- 12. The second Examination referred to in the last paragraph shall take place before the end of April, in order that the District Synod may be made acquainted with the result.
- 13. In no case shall the Examination, in whole or in part, be postponed without the sanction of the General Examination Secretaries, the Chairman of the District, and the Superintendent of the Circuit. A special report of each postponement shall be presented to the May Synod.
- 14. Every Probationer shall, not later than September 21, 1898, inform the Rev. James Hope Moulton, M.A., 3, Queen Anne Terrace, Cambridge, what subjects he will present for Examination.
- 15. Every Probationer, whether appointed to a Circuit or on the List of Reserve, shall be examined in the subjects of his year.
- 16. If any Student be removed from the Theological Institution for Circuit work later than Christmas Day in any year, he shall not be expected to take the subjects prescribed for the examination of Probationers; but provision shall be made for his being examined, not later than June, in four subjects arranged by his Tutors and the General Examination Secretaries, in accordance with the course of study he pursued before leaving the Institution. In every instance three of the subjects presented for Examination shall be books (or portions of books) of Scripture. The result of this Examination shall be reported to the Conference, and shall be included in the special report required in the case of all Candidates for Ordination. The Examination of men on the President's List of Reserve who have not entered upon the four years of probation shall be arranged on a similar principle.
 - 17. The days of Examination for the ensuing year shall be

Friday, December 2, 1898, and Friday, March 31, 1899. For the Fourth Year there will also be a paper in the evening of Thursday, March 30. The Conference directs that these days be kept free from Circuit engagements for the Probationers.

- 18. Should any Probationer be prevented by illness, or otherwise, from attending the Annual Examination, the General Secretaries shall, in concert with the Chairman of the District in which he is stationed, make suitable provision for his Examina-In every case, notification should be sent to the Rev. James Hope Moulton, M.A., as early as possible. Permission for such postponement shall be given only on the ground of illness, or other serious emergency arising at the time of the Examination.
- 19. The Conference sees no sufficient reason for the exemption of those brethren who have formerly been Ministers in other Churches from the usual course of reading and examination prescribed by the Conference for Preachers on Trial, and directs that they be required to observe such regulations.
- 20. The Examination Committee is instructed to prepare and send to each Probationer, early in October, a list of books specially recommended for the reading of Preachers on Trial, some of which shall have particular reference to the scriptural doctrine of the Church. With this shall be sent a classified form on which the Probationer shall describe his reading, theological and general, for the year. This form is to be sent in to the Chairman of the District at least a week before the meeting of the May Synod. The Conference directs that when the Book Lists of Preachers on Trial are under consideration in the Synods, the Chairmen shall note how far their reading has been guided by the recommended list. EXAMINATION OF CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY.

- Q. XV. What are the directions of the Conference respecting the Examination of Candidates for the Ministry?
- A. 1. (1) No Candidate for the Ministry shall be received who does not possess a fair acquaintance with English Grammar, Orthography, Arithmetic, Geography, and History.
- (2) In any case in which a Candidate has not resided for two years continuously in the Circuit from which he is recommended, the Superintendent of that Circuit shall obtain

a written report concerning him from his former Superintendent or Superintendents, so as to cover the previous two years, and present the same to the March Quarterly Meeting and to the District Synod.

(3) A preliminary Examination by papers, which shall be prepared each year by the Tutors of the several Branches of the Theological Institution in turn, shall be conducted, before the session of the District Synod, by a Sub-Committee, who shall value the answers of the Candidates; the report of their valuation to be sent to the District Synod concerned. This Sub-Committee shall be appointed by the Conference. The answers shall be written in the presence of the Superintendents of the Circuits by which the Candidates are recommended, or of one or more other Ministers. This Examination shall be held on Thursday, April 13, 1899.

The Sub-Committee for this year shall consist of the Rev. G. Armstrong Bennetts, B.A., William Foster, B.A., Henry Martin, M.A., J. Holland Ritson, M.A.

- (4) Candidates who have matriculated at the London University, or have passed an equivalent entrance examination at any other University in the United Kingdom, or have passed the Oxford or Cambridge Senior Local Examination, or obtained a Queen's Scholarship as Candidates for Admission into a Training College, are exempt from the preliminary Examination.
- (5) In order to secure, as far as practicable, uniformity of valuation, figures showing the number of marks obtainable by a complete answer shall be placed at the end of each question; and no Candidate shall be considered to have passed a satisfactory examination who does not gain one-fourth of the maximum number of marks allotted to the whole of the papers. No Candidate shall be excused from the preliminary Examination on the ground that he has passed it in a former year.
- (6) No Candidate who has failed to obtain the minimum number of marks in the preliminary Examination shall undergo

the usual Examination by the District Synod unless, in the judgment of the Synod, he possesses such special gifts as to justify an exceptional procedure.

(1) Every Preacher who is recommended for Admission on Trial shall, at or before the time of the May District Synod, preach in the presence of, at least, three of the Ministers of the Synod, to be selected by the Chairman, exclusive of the Superintendent by whom the Candidate is proposed; and a special report of the Sermon shall be made in the District Synod, and immediately forwarded, in writing, to the Secretaries of the Committee for the Examination of Candidates.
- (2) Arrangements shall be made by the May District Synod for the hearing of each Candidate by two Ministers of the District, in addition to those who have heard him before his recommendation by the Synod; and such Ministers shall immediately forward their Report to the Rev. Peter Thompson, 583, Commercial Road, London, E. They are requested not to fix marks of value.
- (3) In the case of Candidates from the Zetland District, arrangements shall be made by the Secretaries of the Committee for the Examination of Candidates for the second trial sermon to be preached in England.
- N.B.—Three different Trial Sermons are required from each Candidate; two preached, and one sent in manuscript.
- (4) District Synods are empowered to examine by Special Committee those Candidates who, for exceptional reasons, are prevented from being present at the appointed time of Examination; every such case to be specially recorded in the Minutes of the Synod, and reported to the Conference.
- 3. The Special Examination of Candidates for the Ministry who have passed the District Synods shall be conducted by a Committee in two Sections, having charge of Examinations to be held simultaneously at Richmond and Didsbury, respectively. This Examination shall be held in the week following Sunday, July 9, 1899.

- (1) The two Sections of this Committee shall be constituted as follows:
- (i.) THE SOUTHERN SECTION, to meet at Richmond, shall consist of the President of the Conference; the Ex-Presidents living in the London and adjoining Districts; two of the Secretaries of the Missionary Society; the Tutors and Governors of the Richmond and Birmingham Branches; the Local Secretary of the Richmond Branch; the Secretary of the Home Mission Committee; one of the General Secretaries of the Examination Committee; the Rev. Robert Culley; together with twelve other Ministers of the three London Districts, four of whom shall be elected by the May Synod of each of the said Districts.
- (ii.) The Northern Section, to meet at Didsbury, shall consist of the Ex-Presidents living in the Manchester and adjoining Districts; two of the Secretaries of the Missionary Society; the Tutors and Governors of the Didsbury and Headingley Branches; the Local Secretary of the Didsbury Branch; one of the General Secretaries of the Examination Committee; the Rev. Simpson Johnson; together with twenty-one Ministers of the Liverpool, Manchester, and Bolton Districts, seven of whom shall be elected by the May Synod of each of the said Districts.

N.B.—The Tutors of the Theological Institution shall conduct the Oral Examination of Candidates before the Committee.

(2) Two Sub-Committees, to read and report on the manuscript sermons of the Candidates, shall be annually appointed as follows: one for the Southern Section, consisting of six Ministers, two of whom shall be chosen by the District Synod of each of the three London Districts from among the Ministers elected by it as members of the Examination Committee; and another for the Northern Section, consisting of six Ministers, two of whom shall be chosen by the District Synods of the Liverpool, Manchester, and Bolton Districts respectively, from among the Ministers elected by them as members of the Examination Committee.

- (3) The Literary Paper for the Examination shall be prepared, in succession, by the Tutors in Biblical Literature and in Classics of each of the four Branches of the Theological Institution; and the Theological Paper for the Examination shall be prepared, in succession, by the Theological Tutors of the said four Branches.
- (4) The Tutors in Biblical Literature and in Classics of the Richmond and Birmingham Branches shall be the Literary Examiners for the Southern Section of the Committee; and the Tutors in Biblical Literature and in Classics of the Didsbury and Headingley Branches shall be the Literary Examiners for the Northern Section of the Committee.
- (5) Candidates who are Graduates of any University in the United Kingdom shall not be required to take the Literary Paper.
- (6) The Examiners of the Papers in Theology, written by the Candidates, shall be appointed as follows: the First and Second London, the Liverpool, and the Manchester District Synods shall each appoint one Examiner from among the Ministers elected by it as Members of the Examination Committee; thus providing two Examiners for each of the two Sections.
- (7) In connexion with each Section of the Committee two Medical Examiners shall be employed, one of whom shall be a specialist on residence in a tropical climate.
- (8) The Rev. Albert Clayton, General Secretary of the Theological Institution, and the Rev. Peter Thompson, are appointed General Secretaries of the Examination Committee.
- (9) All communications relating to Candidates, and the Reports on their sermons heard after the District Synods, must be addressed to the Rev. Peter Thompson, 583, Commercial Road, London, E.
- (10) The Local Secretary of the Richmond Branch of the Theological Institution and the Rev. Robert Culley are appointed to act as Examination Secretaries for the Southern Section; and the Local Secretary for the Didsbury Branch and

the Rev. Simpson Johnson to act as Examination Secretaries for the Northern Section.

- 4. System of Marking in Examinations.—In valuing all Examinations and Trial Sermons, a system of marks by numbers from 1 to 7 shall be adopted: number 1 being the highest value, and 7 the lowest. The seven grades shall signify respectively, Excellent, Very good, Good, Fair, Moderate, Poor, Very poor. The marks 1, 2, 3, denote three grades of an Honours Division; and 4, 5, 6, 7, four grades in a Pass Division; "average" quality being indicated by the mark 4 (fair).
 - 5. Candidates from the Welsh Districts.
- (1) The Conference directs that Candidates from the North and South Wales Districts shall be examined alternately by the two Sections of the Examination Committee, and that a Minister be elected to be a Member of this Committee by the North or the South Wales District Synod, according as the Examination is held at Didsbury or Richmond.
- (2) Candidates from the Welsh Districts are required, if able, to preach two sermons in connexion with the Annual District Synod, one in Welsh and one in English.
- (3) Candidates for the Ministry from the Welsh Districts who are able to preach in English, and who pass their Examinations in English, shall be regarded as eligible for the general work.
- 6. Candidates from Ireland for Foreign Mission Work.—(See *Minutes*, 1886, pp. 203, 204.)
- 7. The names of the Candidates who come before the Candidates' Examination Committee shall be presented to the Conference in three sections: (1) those who are unanimously recommended; (2) those upon whom a divided vote was taken, with the result of the voting (in recording the voting, the number of neutrals shall be given); (3) those who are unanimously declined.
- N.B.—When a Candidate has been recommended by a divided vote in the Examination Committee, he shall be only provisionally accepted until the entire list of Candidates has been considered, when the Conference shall finally decide his case.

- 8. Except when the Conference directs otherwise, accepted Candidates shall be sent forthwith to the Institution.
 - 9. Training of Candidates for the Welsh Ministry.
- (1) In cases in which Candidates for the Ministry recommended by the Welsh Synods possess exceptional qualifications, and in which the District Synod and July Committee are of opinion that a course of training at a Welsh University College would be of special advantage to the Candidates and to our work in the Principality, such Candidates may be permitted to spend some time in connexion with a University College, without cost to any Connexional Fund, before they are formally recognised and accepted as Candidates for the Ministry by the Conference.
- (2) While pursuing his studies at a University College, every such Candidate shall be placed under the special pastoral care of a Minister resident in the town in which the College is situated, who shall present a special report on his conduct and preaching work during the year to the District Synod and to the Conference.
- (3) At the close of his term of study at the University College, every such Candidate shall, on the recommendation of the District Synod, and provided the Conference be satisfied as to his continued fitness for our work, be fully accepted as a Candidate for the Ministry, and shall afterwards receive such training in our Institution as the Conference may direct.

DISCIPLINE COMMITTEES.

THEOLOGICAL INSTITUTION.

- Q. XVI. What are the Resolutions of the Conference with regard to the Discipline Committees for the Theological Institution?
- A. 1. The General Discipline Committee shall consist of all the Members of the Local Discipline Committees, and shall meet at the least twice a year; the first Meeting to be in anticipation of the second Quarterly Meeting of the General

Committee of the Theological Institution, and the second to take place before the fourth Quarterly Meeting of the same General Committee.

- 2. Each Local Discipline Committee shall meet quarterly, and at every meeting enquiry shall be made whether there is any objection to each Student.
- N.B.—This enquiry shall include all questions affecting his moral and religious character, observance of College rules, attention to studies, preaching ability, competency for our work, and health.
- 3. In any case of discipline, when the Local Discipline Committee shall so decide, a Meeting of the General Discipline Committee shall be called to consider the case; and on receiving notice thereof, the General Secretary shall, in consultation with the President of the Conference, arrange for such meeting. The place and time shall be fixed by the President.
- 4. Subject to the foregoing provision, the Local Discipline Committees shall retain the power of summary action in urgent cases, and in cases of idleness or incompetence.
- 5. The Local Discipline Committee, on dismissing a Student from College, shall have power to determine all points concerning his status, employment, and maintenance until the next meeting of the General Discipline Committee, whose decision shall take effect until Conference.
- 6. All cases of discipline during the year, at any Branch of the Institution, shall be reported to the General Discipline Committee at its meeting immediately before Conference.
- 7. The Governor of the Institution House shall answer for the Students to the Conference.
- 8. In the resolutions of the Conference, 1883, on the constitution and powers of the Discipline Committees, the words "that a list of Ministers so appointed shall be forwarded to the Nomination Committee" are deleted, resolution No. 4 is rescinded, and the resolutions so modified are as follows:
- (1) Inasmuch as from the beginning of the Institution the custom has been to refer to the Discipline Committee of the

Branch, consisting of Ministers only, all questions affecting the moral conduct, theological soundness, or general behaviour of the Students, and the Discipline Committee has reported to the Conference; but in cases where the action of the Discipline Committee affected the residence of a Student, the custom has been to inform the Executive Committee of such action, the Conference directs: That no alteration be made in these customs, and that they be uniformly followed in all the Branches.

- (2) The Conference directs that the practice which prevails at some Branches shall be adopted at all; viz. that in accepting the report of the Discipline Committee in regard to the reception as full Students of those who have been three months on probation, the vote of the Executive Committee shall be taken in each case separately.
- (3) The Conference shall appoint from year to year for each Branch of the Institution ten Ministers, who, in addition to the Tutors and Secretary of such Branch, shall constitute the Discipline Committee. The Secretaries of the Missionary Society shall be ex officio members of the Discipline Committee of the Richmond Branch.
- 9. When it is decided by the Local and General Discipline Committees that the full period of three years' training at College should in the case of any Student be shortened, the ministerial probation of such Student shall not be reckoned as beginning until the Conference at which he would have completed his three years' training. This rule shall not apply to Students who have taken a Degree in any of the Universities of the United Kingdom.

The Rev. Albert Clayton is the Secretary of the General Discipline Committee.

- Q. XIX. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on receiving the Report of the Committee on Book Affairs?
- A. 1. The Conference adopts the Report of the Book Committee.
 - 2. The Conference resolves:
- (1) The Book Committee shall consist (a) of the following a officio members: The President of the Conference, the Secretary of the Conference, the Ex-Presidents residing in the London and adjoining Districts, the Book Steward, the Connexional Editor, the Secretary of the Book Committee, the Secretary of the Tract Committee, the Secretary of the Education Committee, the Secretary of the Connexional Sunday-school Union, the Secretaries of the Missionary Society, the Secretary of the Home Mission and Contingent Fund, the Tutors at the Richmond Branch of the Theological Institution, and the Honorary Librarians of the Allan Library; and (b) of twenty-five Ministers to be annually appointed by the Conference from those resident in the Metropolitan Postal and Police area.
- (2) A Finance and Consultation Committee, consisting of fourteen Members, including the Officers of the Book Room, shall be appointed by the Book Committee from its own Members at its first meeting after Conference.
- (3) Readers shall be annually chosen by the Book Committee at its first meeting after Conference; and one or more of these shall be selected by the Book Steward to read any Manuscript offered for publication, who shall make confidential reports to the Book Steward and Editor.

The Book Steward shall report to the Committee, and the Committee shall have power to accept or reject Manuscripts.

(4) The Tract Committee shall consist of the Officers of the Book Room and twelve other Ministers to be annually appointed by the Conference from those resident within the same area as the London Book Committee. The names of the Tract Committee shall be printed in the *Minutes of Conference*.

Transfers and Reports on Probationers, etc.—I. The Conference appoints a Committee, consisting of the President and Secretary of the Conference and fifteen other Ministers, five of whom shall be chosen by the Home Mission, the Foreign Missionary, and the Theological Institution Committees, respectively. The Secretary of the Conference is the Convener of the Committee.

- 2. This Committee shall sit prior to the Sessions of the Conference, to consider and report upon:
- (1) All cases of proposed transfer between the Foreign and the Home Work.
- (2) All cases in which the Conference has determined that special reports upon Probationers shall be presented to the ensuing Conference.
- (3) The health and general fitness for our work of the men on the President's List of Reserve.
 - (4) The number of Candidates required for the Ministry.

(5) All applications for admission to our work made by Ministers of other Conferences and Churches.

Religious Knowledge Certificates. — 1. The Conference receives the Report of the Committee.

- 2. The Conference resolves:
- (1) As the Examination for Local Preachers, conducted under the direction of the District Local Preachers' Committee, meets the want for which this Examination was primarily intended, there is no longer the same need for this work.
- (2) As nearly all the candidates for Religious Knowledge Certificates are Sunday-school Teachers or Senior Scholars, an examination for them can be better provided by the Connexional Sunday-school Union; and the Conference refers this part of the work to the Committee of that Union.
 - 3. The Committee is discharged.

The Law of Appeal, and Other Matters.—I. The Conference receives the Report of the Committee,

2. The Conference resolves that the Regulation relating to expelled Ministers passed in 1817 (*Minutes*, vol. iv., p. 344) shall be amended so as to read as follows:

No preacher excluded for immorality, or who resigns his connexion with the Conference while under charges which affect his moral character, shall at any subsequent period be allowed to be Local Preacher, Class Leader, or even a private member of Society, without the consent of the Conference previously obtained.

- 3. The Conference directs that before a Local Preacher from another branch of the Methodist Church is put on the Circuit Plan, he shall satisfy the Superintendent and the Local Preachers' Meeting that he holds our doctrines, approves our discipline, and has competent abilities for the work.
- 4. In order to provide, in case of death or mental incapacity, for the devolution of the authority and responsibility vested in the Superintendent of a Circuit, especially in solitary stations and in Circuits where there is no other Preacher in full Connexion with the Conference, the Conference directs that the first paragraph in the N.B. at the head of the Stations shall be amended as follows:

After the words, "and the Minister first named is the Superintendent" the following sentence shall be added:

In the event of his death, resignation, or incapacity, the Minister next named, provided such Minister be in Full Connexion with the Conference, and in full work, is the Superintendent. In case there is no Minister in full Connexion with the Conference, and in full work, appointed to or remaining in the Circuit, the Chairman of the District is the Superintendent.

5. The Conference provisionally resolves that the second and third paragraphs under Question I. of the Order and Form of Business of Local Preachers' Meetings (Minutes, 1896, p. 458), shall be amended so as to read as follows:—

The Meeting has authority to make these enquiries. Should an objection affecting his standing on the Plan be formally made against a Local Preacher, the Meeting may proceed to consider it; and if, in its judgment, the objection is sustained, the Superintendent shall determine and pronounce the sentence; subject, however, to the right of appeal against the sentence on the part either of the person accused, or of the Local Preachers' Meeting, to the District Synod and the Conference.

A Local Preacher who has been aggrieved in any matter affecting his standing as a Local Preacher by a Superintendent acting in conjunction with an ordinary Local Preachers' Meeting shall have a right of appeal to a Local Preachers' Meeting specially convened to reconsider the case; and the finding of that Meeting as to matters of fact shall be final. The right to determine the sentence in this, as in all other judicial cases of discipline, is within the exclusive province of the Superintendent, after consultation with his colleagues. And against this sentence all parties shall have a right of appeal to the District Synod and the Conference. Any action, however, which may be taken by the Local Preachers' Meeting cannot interfere with the jurisdiction of the Leaders' Meeting, which is the court charged with the consideration of questions which affect Church membership.

- 6. The Conference remits the further consideration of the Right of Appeal in the case of Stewards and Leaders to the Committee, which is re-appointed for the purpose.
 - 7. The following is the Committee:

Candidates for the Ministry.—Whenever a Superintendent recommends his son as a Candidate for the Ministry, the character of the Candidate shall be signed also by his colleague or colleagues. In cases in which the Superintendent is appointed to a solitary station, the character of the Candidate shall be countersigned by the Chairman of the District.

Ossett and Horbury Circuit.—I. The Conference receives the Report of the Commission.

2. The Commission is re-appointed, with the same powers as last year, as follows: The Rev. John S. Banks, John Hornabrook, Dr. Henry J. Pope, Dr. Randles, and Albert Bishop, Convener.

Disciplinary Enquiries.—The Conference re-affirms its decision that subjects discussed in Conference in answer to the question, "Is there any objection to any of our Ministers or Preachers on Trial?" are to be regarded as strictly private and confidential.

Expulsion of Members.—Inasmuch as a Superintendent is directed to bring before the weekly meeting of the Preachers of the Circuit every case of proposed expulsion of a member, in order that he may have the advantage of hearing the opinions and advice of his colleagues and co-pastors, before he shall finally decide on the course he ought to adopt, the Conference directs that when the Superintendent has not a colleague, and cannot therefore consult a weekly meeting of

the Preachers of the Circuit, he shall, in every case of the proposed expulsion of a member of Society, take counsel with the Chairman of the District.

Church Officers and the Liquor Traffic.—I. The Conference was never more alive than at the present time to the dire results of the liquor traffic, and rejoices in the progress of Temperance sentiment and practice in the Wesleyan Methodist Church; but it feels that to interfere with the constitutional method of appointing our Church officers is undesirable, in the interests of Temperance work itself, as well as on other grounds.

2. At the same time, the Conference recommends our people to keep themselves free from complicity with a traffic the results of which are so injurious to the interests of religion, morality, and social life.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.—The Conference directs that the attention of Chairmen of Districts be specially called to the Standing Orders on this subject. (See p. 399, § 88).

SECTION II.

THE REPRESENTATIVE SESSION.

COMMITTEE OF PRIVILEGES.

Q. XXII. What are the Committees for Guarding our Privileges during the ensuing year?

- 5. The Conference expresses its satisfaction at the passing of the Marriage Act, 1898 (61 and 62 Vict., Cap. 58), being An Act to amend the Law relating to the Attendance of Registrars at Marriages in Nonconformist Places of Worship.

This Act will come into operation on April 1, 1899. Copies of the Act may be obtained at the Book Room, London.

6. The Conference again directs the Committee to consider

during the year the electoral disadvantages to which Wesleyan Methodist Ministers are subject in consequence of the Itinerancy, and to take such legal action as may be advisable in order to the removal of such disadvantages.

7. The Conference directs that Rule 47 of Schedule 1. of the Prisons Act of 1865 be printed in the *Minutes*:

If any prisoner is of a religious persuasion differing from that of the Established Church, and no Minister has been appointed to attend at the prison on the prisoners of that persuasion, the Visiting Justices shall permit a Minister of such persuasion, to be approved by them, to visit such prisoners at proper and reasonable times, and under such restrictions as may be imposed by the Visiting Justices to guard against the introduction of improper persons and prevent improper communications, unless such prisoner expressly objects to see such Minister.

MISSIONS.

- Q. XXIII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of our Foreign Missions?
- A. I. The thanks of the Conference are presented to the Rev. James H. Rigg, D.D., and Mr. T. Morgan Harvey, the General Treasurers of the Wesleyan Methodist Missionary Society.

The Conference adopts the following Resolution on the retirement of Mr. T. Morgan Harvey from the office of Lay General Treasurer of the Society:

The Conference receives with sincere regret the resignation of the Lay Treasurer of the Society, Mr. T. Morgan Harvey, who is compelled, by the state of his health, to relinquish his office. For ten years Mr. Harvey has filled with conspicuous ability the position from which he now retires, giving close attention to the business of the Society, and devoting time

and strength without stint to its service. He has also been foremost in generous gifts, and the improved financial position of the Missionary Society to-day is due in large measure to his sagacity and liberality. The Conference places on record its grateful appreciation of Mr. Harvey's services, as well as its esteem for him personally; it sympathises with him in his affliction, and earnestly prays that his life may be prolonged and full of "the blessing of the Lord."

- (7) The thanks of the Conference are presented to the various Officers and Committees of the Fund, and to the District Treasurers of the Maintenance Section, for the faithful discharge of the duties of their respective offices; also to Mr. T. Walton Stead, Honorary Auditor of the Trinity Hall School Accounts.
- (8) The General Committee shall meet during the ensuing year on Friday, November 25, in Manchester; on Friday, March 24, 1899, in Bath; and on Friday, June 23, in London.

2. Income of the Fund.

The Conference directs:

- (1) The amounts to be raised in each District for the general purposes of the Children's Fund, Maintenance, and Education, be as set forth in Schedule B.
- (2) Ministers in Departments, and those without pastoral charge, shall be assessed for the Maintenance Section of the Fund at £18 each, and shall pay the assessments for which they are liable in respect of this Section to the Rev. G. STRINGER These assessments are not included in Schedule B.
- (3) No children's allowances can be claimed by Ministers on whose behalf the ordinary assessment has not been paid.
- (4) The Ministerial Subscriptions (vis. Ministers, one guinea; Preachers on Trial, half a guinea) are continued; and the payment by Ministers in Circuits and Departments, having children at the Schools, of £2 for each child at school, shall be, as heretofore, in addition to the subscription of one guinea.
- (5) Ministers received into Full Connexion with the Conference, yet not provided with houses, shall, in the matter of the annual subscription, be treated as Preachers on Trial, subscribing half a guinea per annum to the Fund.
- (6) The Education Section of the Fund shall be made selfadjusting upon the lines already adopted in respect of the Maintenance Section. The extra charge upon each Circuit calling out an additional Minister is therefore £,2 per annum during the period of probation, and f_{14} per annum afterwards.

3. Kingswood School.

The Conference directs:

(1) The School Year shall begin in January; and not later than November 1 the name and age of every applicant for admission must be sent to the Rev. Dr. Bowden, Woodford House, Chew Stoke, Bristol. Under special circumstances admission may take place at other times than January. Boys shall not in general be admitted before the age of ten.

- N.B.—In the case of boys admitted by vote of the Governing Body under the age of ten, or at any other period of the year than January, the parent may be required by the Governing Body to pay for the portion of that year at the rate of £25. Such parents receive the privileges detailed in § 5 (p. 271).
- (2) Entrance Examination. An examination will be set in elementary English subjects suitable to boys of about the age of eleven. A graduated age allowance will be made for younger boys, while older boys will be expected to reach a correspondingly higher standard, and boys above the age of twelve will be expected to show some knowledge of Latin and French. A specimen examination paper will be sent by the Headmaster, Mr. Walter P. Workman, M.A., B.Sc., upon receipt of a stamped envelope.
- (3) Residence. The ordinary time of residence shall be six years, provided that the education allowances have either not been received or have been returned (see § 5 (4), p. 272).
- (4) Scholarships. The terms of election shall be fixed by the Governing Body. So far as consonant with the trusts affecting them, the Scholarships shall be awarded as a general rule to boys in their seventeenth year. Some shall be reserved for those who have already held one Scholarship. The Exhibition upon the Foundation of the late John Fernley shall be tenable at any place of higher education.
 - (5) Extra Years. The scale of payment shall be as follows:
 Sons of Supernumeraries and Widows ... £22
 Boys recommended by the Governor and
 Headmaster as being "near to winning
 a Scholarship" £25
 For all others £30

Such payments shall be due in four equal instalments, one on each quarter day.

Ministers whose sons hold Scholarships or have secured an extra year shall not be liable for the additional Assessment (vide § 2 (4), p. 268).

Such Ministers shall be entitled to the six guineas from the Maintenance Section; and, unless they have already received for six years, to the £12 for Education.

- (6) Notice of Removal from School. Parents having children at the School shall be required to give three months' notice before the removal of such child or children. In the event of parents not giving such notice, the officers of the Fund shall be authorised to withhold three months' allowances, which would otherwise be payable for each such child or children. If a boy to whom an extra year has been granted be withdrawn without the required three months' notice, the parent or guardian shall pay one-fourth of the sum charged for the extra year in lieu of such notice.
- (7) The application of the rule respecting the clothing of the sons of necessitous Supernumeraries or Widows shall be left to the discretion of the General Committee.

4. Trinity Hall School.

The Conference directs:

(1) The School Year shall begin in January, and not later than November 1 the name and age of every applicant for admission shall be sent to the Rev. RALPH M. Spoor, 57, Church Road, Richmond, Surrey.

Under special circumstances admission may take place at other times than January. Girls shall not, in general, be admitted before the age of twelve.

(2) Entrance Examination.

Reading: A few lines of poetry selected by the examiner.

Writing (Small Hand): Eight lines to be slowly dictated from a reading book. This will also be a test of spelling.

Arithmetic: The Four Simple Rules and the Four Compound Rules (Money and Weights and Measures).

Geography: Outlines of the Geography of Europe in general, and particularly of England.

Grammar: To parse simple sentences correctly and readily.

History: To have a fair knowledge of Bible History and of the History of England.

Plain Needlework.

The Examination shall be graduated according to the age of the girl, or other circumstances, at the discretion of the Governing Body.

- (3) Residence. The ordinary term of residence shall be four years for girls on whose behalf not more than two educational payments have been made previous to their entrance at School. Every such payment in excess of two shall diminish the time of residence at the School.
 - (4) Extra Years. The scale of payment shall be as follows

 Daughters of Supernumeraries and Widows ... £22

 For all others £30

Such payments shall be due in four equal instalments, one on each quarter day.

Ministers whose daughters hold Scholarships, or have secured an extra year, shall not be liable for the additional Assessment (see § 2 (4), p. 268).

Such Ministers shall be entitled to the six guineas from the Maintenance Section; and, unless they have already received for six years, to the £12 for Education.

- (5) Notice of Removal from School. The Regulation for Kingswood School (§ 3 (6), p. 270) shall, mutatis mutandis, apply to Trinity Hall School.
- (6) Vacations. The School Year at Trinity Hall School shall be divided into three terms. The Managing Committee shall, so far as possible, arrange that the Midsummer vacation shall overlap the vacation at Kingswood.

5. Educational Allowances for Children not at the Schools.

The Conference directs:

- (1) Payments shall be made at Conference for the kalendar year then current.
- (2) Parents may begin to claim for their children when they are nine, ten, eleven, or twelve years of age on the preceding Christmas Day; but the first claim for a child who

is twelve years of age on or before any Christmas Day must be made at the following Conference at the latest.

- (3) Parents who have once begun to claim shall receive their payments annually. This regulation shall not apply in the case of a candidate for admission to the Schools who has passed the Entrance Examination, but for whom there is not room at the next following re-opening.
- (4) Return of Educational Allowances. Any Educational Allowance may be returned within the kalendar year in which it is received. Educational allowances received in previous years may be returned, provided that Simple Interest is paid thereon at the rate of five per cent per annum for such period as they have been held.
- (5) Circuit Schedules. Not later than March I each Superintendent shall send to the Rev. John Kinnings, 14, St. Mary's Road, Cheetham Hill, Manchester, a particular account of all claims for Educational Allowances in his Circuit; specifying distinctly the names of the children for whose education the claims are made, together with the date, year, and place of their birth, and the exact number of years during which the allowance has been received. No claim to be entered upon this schedule for children at the Schools.

CHAPEL AFFAIRS.

- Q. XXVI. What are the Resolutions of the Conference with regard to Chapel Affairs?
- A. 1. The Conference receives and adopts the Report of the Committee.
- 2. The Conference authorises the President, during the year, to affix his signature to any consent to the sale of Trust Property which may be certified to him as approved by the Chapel Committee.
- 3. Irregular Chapel Cases.—The Conference receives the Report.

The Conference directs the Chapel Committee to send to the several District Synods the particulars of those cases in which, in the opinion of the Committee, it is desirable that special enquiry should be made from time to time, until it shall appear that the conditions of erection or enlargement have been fulfilled.

The Conference further directs the District Synods to call the attention of the Trustees to those cases in which the proportion of debt is excessively heavy, or the proceedings wholly irregular, and to communicate the judgment of the District Synod to the Trustees through the Superintendents.

- 5. The Rev. John Hornabrook is the General Secretary of the Chapel Committee.

- 1. The Conference adopts the Report of the Committee, and directs that an Abstract of it be printed in the *Minutes*. (See Appendix VI.)
- 2. The Conference, recognising the great benefits which the Fund has conferred on Metropolitan Methodism and on the cause of Christ generally, calls on all Metropolitan Methodists, and especially on the Trustees and all others interested in the one hundred Chapels already erected with the aid of this Fund, to sustain it to the utmost of their power, that sufficient means may be provided for the further development of Methodism in the immense and ever-growing Metropolis. It trusts also

that the Methodists of the Provinces will heartily aid their London brethren in this movement.

- 3. The Conference authorises the following new Regulations:
- (1) The Committee shall have power, out of the income derived from Annual Subscriptions and Collections, after paying such expenses as legal considerations suggest, to appropriate such sums from time to time as it may think fit towards helping to provide ministerial supplies for a few years, by diminishing Grants, for the new Chapels to be built with the assistance of the Fund.
- (i.) These Grants shall be made from year to year by vote of the Committee, on application of the promoters of the Chapel and cause concerned.
- (ii.) These Grants shall be made, not to supersede, but to supplement and stimulate local efforts, whether on the part of the Circuit in which the Chapels are situated, or, if outside any Circuit, on the part of the promoters of the Chapels; and they shall not be absorbed in ordinary Circuit income.
- (iii.) These Grants shall be paid quarterly on application, and with each application a return shall be made of the financial condition of the cause on behalf of which they are made, showing the amount provided by the Circuit, or other promoters, and whether this is (a) collected on the spot, (b) in the Circuit, or (c) from sources outside the Circuit or locality.
- (iv.) These Grants may be commenced from the time a Minister, whether married or unmarried, is appointed to the Chapel, and the building is commenced.
- (v.) The co-operation of the Home Mission Fund with the Committee in sustaining these new causes shall be sought and promoted.
- (vi.) Failure to comply with the conditions on which a Grant is made shall involve its immediate suspension or even cessation.
- (2) The Minister thus appointed shall be kept to his special work and be responsible for its success.
 - 4. The Conference further resolves that to avoid misunder-

standings in the administration of the Extension Fund and the Metropolitan Chapel Building Fund, no Grants or Loans shall be made from both Funds to any one Trust estate without a Special Vote of the Conference.

- 5. The thanks of the Conference are presented to the General Treasurers, His Hon. Judge Waddy, Q.C., and Mr. Alexander M'Arthur, D.L., and to the other Officers of the Fund, for their services during the past year.
- 6. The following are re-appointed the Officers for the ensuing year: His Hon. Judge Waddy, Q.C., and Mr. Alexander M'Arthur, D.L., Treasurers; the Rev. John Bond, General Secretary; Sir Clarence Smith, the Rev. Joseph Olphert, William D. Walters, and Jabez Ingram, Assistant Secretaries. The Committee shall consist of:

1. The ex officio Members: the Rev. Hugh Price Hughes, M.A., President of the Conference; Marshall Hartley, Secretary of the Conference; the Treasurers, Secretary, and Assistant Secretaries; the Secretary of the Chapel Committee; and the Secretary of the Home Mission Fund.

- 2. The elected Members:

the Rev. Charles Garrett is appointed Treasurer.

The Rev. John Hornabrook is the Convener.

The Houses of Rest at Colwyn Bay and at Grange shall be under the care of the Invalid Ministers' Rest Fund Sub-Committee. All applications for terms of residence during the summer and autumn must be made not later than March 1, to the Rev. John Hornabrook, Central Buildings, Oldham Street, Manchester.

These applications shall be brought before the Committee early in March, it being understood that the preference shall always be given to Invalid Ministers. Should any emergency arise, the Rev. Walford Green, in conjunction with the Chairmen of the Liverpool and Manchester Districts, shall be empowered to make the necessary arrangements.

THEOLOGICAL INSTITUTION.

- Q. XXX. What are the Resolutions of the Conference with regard to the Theological Institution?
- A. I. The Conference receives the Report of the General Committee, the Tutors, and Examiners, together with the financial statement of the General Treasurers.

- 12. The Conference directs that the following Resolutions, previously adopted, shall be reprinted:
- (1) Wherever it is practicable, two Collections shall be made annually in each chapel throughout the Connexion on behalf of the Funds of the Institution; and these Collections shall be made, if possible, in December.
- (2) The Conference directs the Superintendents of Circuits to remit all Subscriptions and Collections for the Institution to the General Treasurers early in the year; and instructs the Chairmen of Districts to ascertain, by enquiry at the May Synod, whether such payments have been made.
- (3) The Conference affirms the principle, which has from the beginning been recognised in the administration of the Institution, in regard to charges on account of Students, that such Students as have the means, or whose friends have the means, shall be expected to contribute, in whole or in part, according to their ability, towards the cost of their own maintenance and education; and it directs the General Committee to consider and adopt such methods as may be deemed best for carrying this rule into effect.
- (4) A minimum charge for maintenance shall be made, which every Student shall be expected to defray; it being, however, distinctly understood that the General Committee shall be empowered to remit the charge wherever, and in so far as, it may be found on enquiry that any Student is unable to pay. And further, all Students who are able, either themselves or by their parents and friends, to add, to the payment for maintenance, payment on account of education, should be urged to do so.
- (5) The Conference directs that information be given to the General Treasurers of the Institution Fund of the resignation of any Probationer, or of any Minister who has not been ten years in the Full Work of the Ministry, in order that a list may be kept of those who have not discharged their obligations in respect of their Institution training.

EDUCATION.

- Q. XXXI. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of Wesleyan Education?
- A. 1. The Conference receives the Report of the proceedings of the Education Committee during the year, together with a Statistical Statement relating to Training Colleges, Day Schools, Sunday Schools, and the Connexional Sunday-school Union; and directs that an Abstract thereof be printed in the Minutes. (See Appendix III.)
- 2. The thanks of the Conference are presented to the Rev. Walford Green, to Mr. Thomas Barnsley, and to Mr. WILLIAM VANNER, for their services as Treasurers of the Education Fund.
- 3. The Conference re-appoints the Rev. WALFORD GREEN, Mr. Thomas Barnsley, and Mr. William Vanner, Treasurers of the Education Fund.

The special duty of Mr. William Vanner shall be the charge of the Sunday-school Union branch of the finance.

- 4. The Education Committee shall consist of the following:

- 5. The Conference empowers the Wesleyan Education Committee to make grants towards expenditure incurred by structural and other alterations demanded by the Education Department in Day-school premises.
- 6. Administrative Resolutions.—The Conference directs that the following Resolutions, previously adopted, shall be reprinted:
- (1) The Conference empowers the Education Committee to make Grants, on inspection, to new Schools to which the provisions of the Minute of the Education Department, dated June 21, 1878, apply, and for the probationary period during which, under the said Minute, such Schools cannot receive Grants in aid from the Department.
- (2) The Conference expresses its opinion that, in view of the working of existing arrangements for Public Elementary Education, it is highly desirable that the number of Wesleyan Day Schools should at least be maintained. The Conference therefore strongly recommends that before steps are taken towards the closing or transfer of any Wesleyan Day School, the proposal to close or transfer it be communicated to the

Education Committee, in order that they may have an opportunity of suggesting alternative proposals for the consideration of Local Managers.

- (3) The Conference directs that in all cases of difficulty in carrying on our Connexional Day Schools that are likely to result in the closing or transfer of such Schools, before such action be initiated the District Education Committee shall be consulted; it being understood that such consultation shall not interfere with the direction of the Conference requiring consultation with the General Education Committee.
- (4) The Conference directs that in all ordinary cases of Day Schools conducted on Wesleyan Trust premises, no such Schools shall be discontinued so long as there is a reasonable prospect of their being carried on without serious embarrassment. The same general principle shall apply to Wesleyan Day Schools conducted in premises rented for the purpose under the management of a recognised Wesleyan School Committee.

When, however, the discontinuance of a Day School is proposed, before such proposal is carried into effect, the Superintendent shall consult the Trustees, the Managing Committee, and the Subscribers; and if in any case there is a considerable division of opinion, the case shall be submitted to the Quarterly Meeting of the Circuit. In all cases, the general principle laid down by the Conference respecting the Transfer of Schools—vis. that the Superintendents of the Circuits, with the Managers and Trustees acting in concert, shall consult the Education Committee—shall be adhered to.

- (5) The Conference declares that it shall not be deemed to be within the power and option of a Superintendent to prevent the establishment or continuance of a Wesleyan Day School, so long as responsible parties pledge themselves to bear all the financial cost and risk.
- (6) (i.) In view of the interpretation which is put upon Section XXIII. of the Elementary Education Act by the Lords of the Committee of Council—to the effect that any transfer of a School, settled upon our School Model Deed No. I., to a

School Board, for any term whatever, for the purposes of such School Board, must be sanctioned not only by the signatures of the Trustees, but by the Conference, testified by the President in writing,—the Conference directs that in every case in which the transfer of such a School is proposed, the Superintendent, with the Managers and Trustees acting in concert, shall first consult the Education Committee on the subject, and that if, for reasons given, that Committee recommends such a transfer, the Rules of the Conference in relation to the sale of Trust Property shall be applicable thereto: the Education Committee considering all questions affecting School Management, and the Chapel Committee questions affecting Trust Property.

- (ii.) In respect to Schools settled on the School Model Deed No. II., or on any other Deed in which the consent of the Conference is rendered necessary for the alienation of the property, the Conference recommends the Trustees to act upon the same principles as those laid down in the foregoing clause in relation to Schools settled on the School Model Deed No. I.
- (iii.) In all cases of transfer which may hereafter occur, the Conference recommends that provision be made in the instrument of transfer to secure the resumption of the premises by the Trustees, without their being required to reimburse any money laid out upon them by the School Board solely for its own purposes.
 - 7. The Conference further directs as follows:
- (1) All who are contemplating the erection or alteration of premises for the establishment of new Schools shall communicate with the Education Committee, for the purpose of receiving counsel as to their projected undertakings and the adaptation of the premises to the system of instruction designed to be adopted.
- (2) The Managers of every School shall require from the Teacher, at least once a year, a report as to the nature and extent of the Religious Instruction given in the School, in

order that they may be satisfied that the truths of Scripture are regularly taught to the children.

- (3) It is deemed desirable that the Managers shall arrange, in conjunction with the Teacher, for regular examinations of the School in Religious Knowledge; such examinations to be conducted, as to time and method, as circumstances may require.
- (4) A General Report on the Religious Instruction given in the Day Schools, founded upon the Teachers' Reports from the several Schools, as well as upon the personal visitation of the Ministers, shall be submitted to the March Quarterly Meetings, when the Returns as to the Day and Sunday Schools of the Circuit are presented.
- (5) The October Examination of Pupil Teachers in Religious Knowledge shall be held on the *last* Saturday of that month. The March Examination will continue to be held on the *first* Saturday of that month.
- 8. Resolutions of 1891 and 1895.—The Conference directs that its declaration made in 1891, and repeated in 1895, be reprinted as follows:
- (1) That the primary object of Methodist policy in the matter of Elementary Education is the establishment of School Boards everywhere, acting in districts of sufficient area, and the placing of a Christian unsectarian school within reasonable distance of every family. This is of special importance in rural districts, where our people have no alternative to the compulsory attendance of their children at Anglican schools.
- (2) That there should be no increased grant of public funds, whether from the local rates or from the imperial taxes, to denominational schools, unless that increased grant is accompanied by adequate and representative public management.
- (3) That no national system of education which shall exclude from the Day Schools the Bible, and religious instruction therefrom by the Teachers, suited to the capacities of children, will meet the necessity of the country.

- (4) That our Connexional Training Colleges should be maintained in full vigour and efficiency.
- (5) And, lastly, that with respect to our Connexional Day Schools, the Conference repeats its often declared sense of the great services they have rendered to Methodism, and to the sacred cause of National Christian Education; and it emphasises their special importance in those localities where it is impossible to establish School Boards acting in districts of sufficient area, and having under their control Christian unsectarian schools.
- 9. Sunday Schools.—The third Sunday in October in each year shall be observed as a day for Special Prayer on behalf of Sunday Schools and young people.
- 10. The Conference attaches the utmost importance to doctrinal teaching in Sunday Schools by means of Catechetical instruction, and directs that Ministers shall give special attention to this subject. Superintendents and Teachers are also urgently and affectionately recommended to do their utmost to promote the use of our own Catechisms in our Sunday Schools.
- 11. The Conference resolves that, while it may be well to provide a separate service for very young children, it is most undesirable that scholars of eight years of age and upwards should be kept from the services in our chapels.
- 12. The Conference directs that the District Education Committee shall be consulted before a Sunday School is closed.
- 13. Day and Sunday Schools.—The Statistics of the Day and Sunday Schools of each Circuit shall be read in the March Quarterly Meeting; but if sufficient time be not then available for the discussion of the Statistics, and for enquiry into the state of the Schools, such discussion and enquiry shall take place in the June Quarterly Meeting.
- 14. The Education Schedules, having been duly filled up and presented to the March Quarterly Meeting, shall be sent by the Superintendents to the District Education Secretary, not later than April 20 in each year.

15. District Sunday-school Committees shall have charge also of the interests of the Day Schools in their respective Districts.

Joint Committee of Enquiry.—The Conference directs the Middle-class Education Committee and the Special Committee on Secondary Education to meet together during the year to enquire and report as follows:

- 1. As to the constitution and equipment of the Connexional Middle-class Schools; and to invite, if thought desirable, representatives of the various Boards of Directors, and the Head Masters and Head Mistresses.
 - 2. As to the possibility of establishing some satisfactory

relationship between such Middle-class Schools as are thoroughly Methodist in their character and management, but are not included within the present arrangements of the Middle-class Schools Committee.

The Conference receives with pleasure the Reports of Wesley College, Sheffield, and Queen's College, Taunton, Limited. Although not Connexional Schools, these were established primarily in the interests of Methodism, and are under Methodist management. Each has rendered invaluable service to the cause of Christian education, and to the Methodist Church.

The Conference appoints the Rev. J. Agar Beet, D.D., and Mr. William H. Reed to be Directors of Queen's College, Taunton, Limited.

THE CHILDREN'S HOME AND ORPHANAGE.

- Q. XXXII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of the Children's Home and Orphanage?
- A. 1. The Conference receives the Report of the Children's Home and Orphanage, and directs that an Abstract be printed in the *Minutes*. (See Appendix IV.)
- 2. The Conference hereby authorises the President to affix his signature as Representative of the Conference to any sale of property recommended by the General Committee of the Children's Home.
- 3. The Conference expresses its satisfaction that, in a year of special claims upon the charitable public, the income of the Children's Home has not declined; but in view of the desirable enlargement of this work, to which the Committee is pledged, regards it as absolutely necessary that the income should steadily and considerably increase.
- 4. The Conference hears with pleasure that the effort to secure for the children of Methodists and other Nonconform-

ists the social and spiritual advantages of being brought up in homes away from the Workhouse Schools has already met with encouraging success. It is gratified that already eighty-four such children have been received by arrangement with forty-seven Boards of Guardians, and expresses its determination energetically to support the Committee of the Children's Home in the effort to gain for all such children the privileges made possible by law, and to which they have every legal, moral, and spiritual claim.

- 5. The Conference expresses its satisfaction that the efforts made to train Nonconformist children in other than Workhouse Schools are supplementary to, and not instead of the original work of the Homes, which is being prosecuted in full vigour; and that a promising commencement has been made in caring for children suffering under epileptic disorders.
- 6. The Conference consents to the appointment of a Minister as Vice-Principal of the Home.

RELIGIOUS OBSERVANCE OF THE LORD'S DAY.

- Q. XXXIII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on receiving the Report of the Committee for Promoting the Religious Observance of the Lord's Day?
- A. 1. The Conference adopts the Report, and re-affirms its steadfast belief in the divine authority and perpetual obliga-

tion of the Lord's Day, and its conviction of the necessity that all effectual defence and assertion of the Lord's Day rest must proceed on that basis.

- 2. The Conference rejoices to learn that no legislation tending to the detriment of the Day has been introduced into Parliament during its recent session; yet, remembering that powerful forces are at work to undermine the sacredness of this divine institution, urges the Methodist people to oppose all forms of Sunday desecration, and to promote the due observance of the holy day.
- 3. The Conference solemnly protests against the Sunday evening concerts in the Alhambra Theatre, London, which have been organised by the Sunday League; and has sent a memorial to the London County Council requesting it to withhold its sanction from this dangerous experiment.

TEMPERANCE.

- Q. XXXVI. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of Temperance?
- A. 1. The Conference receives and adopts the Report of the Committee, and directs that an abstract thereof be printed in the *Minutes*. (See Appendix V.)
- 2. The Conference recommends that, on the last Sunday of November in each year, special reference shall be made in all Wesleyan Methodist places of worship, and in all our Sunday Schools, to the appalling extent and dire results of Intemperance.
- 3. The Conference expresses its regret that the Government has not given facilities for the passing of the Irish and English Sunday Closing Bills, and resolves that a Memorial, signed by the President and Secretary of the Conference, shall be addressed to the Marquess of Salisbury, urging upon the Government the granting of such facilities in the next session of Parliament.
- 4. The Conference declares its sympathy with the effort of the Sunday Closing Special Campaign Committee, and urges our people to be unremitting in their efforts to secure the closing of public-houses on the Lord's day throughout the United Kingdom.
- 5. The Conference again calls attention to its recommendation that in all our Bands of Hope the Quarterly Ticket of membership shall be used, and that this ticket shall be given not only to those who are members of the Band of Hope in the ordinary way, but also to those young people in our Sunday Schools, who may be unable to attend Band of Hope Meetings, but who are willing to enrol their names in the Sunday-school Teacher's Pledge Book.
- 6. The Conference recommends the appointment of a Circuit Temperance Secretary in every Circuit; and Superintendents are directed to send the name and address of such

Secretary to the Secretary of the Conference Temperance Committee not later than the end of September; but where no Circuit Temperance Secretary is appointed, the Superintendents of Circuits are directed to send to the Connexional Temperance Secretary by the same date the names and addresses of all the Secretaries of Bands of Hope and Temperance Societies in their respective Circuits.

- 7. The Conference deeply deplores the widespread prevalence of betting, gambling, and kindred practices, and expresses its grief that the newspaper press of this country stimulates these vices by the publication of sporting items. It declares its hope that before long there may be some effective legislation for the suppression of these evils, and especially for prohibiting the publication of betting items by the newspapers. The Conference urges all our people to exert themselves in all possible ways for the suppression of this vice, and especially to seek to influence Parish, District, and County Councils to use their powers against the practice of gambling in public places.
- 8. The Conference rejoices in the continuance of the effort to prevent the sale or delivery of intoxicating liquors to children, and repeats the expression of its hope that Benches of Magistrates and Municipal Authorities will use their powers for the suppression of the practice of such sale or delivery to children under thirteen years of age.
- 9. The Conference sanctions the appointment in every Synod of one of the lay members of the Temperance Committee as Joint Secretary with the Ministerial Secretary.

O. XXXVIII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of Social Purity?

- A. I. The Conference receives and adopts the Report of the Committee.
- 2. The Conference reaffirms its unflinching opposition to every form of State Regulation of vice, and will strenuously withstand any policy for counteracting the effects of vice which involves such regulation.
- 3. The Conference directs the Committee to watch the operation of the rules and regulations laid down for the Army by the Government of India, and to take such action as may

be desirable to oppose anything of the nature of State Regulation, should it be attempted.

- 4. In presence of growing laxity of thought and practice in many quarters, the Conference urges upon all Methodists, and especially upon those who have to do with young people in Bible-classes, Guilds, and other Societies—the duty of exercising watchful care over all moral interests, and of exercising an influence which may tend to lessen temptation to evil by the strengthening of sound principles, the discreet communication of necessary information, and the repression of all social customs which are hostile to a high-toned morality.

CONCERTED ACTION.

- 1. The Conference receives the Report of the Committee.
- 2. The Conference resolves that Concerted Action among the Methodist Churches is eminently desirable.
- 3. In order to the promotion of such action the Conference agrees:

That a United Committee be annually constituted by the appointment of Representatives by the several Conferences for the purpose of mutual defence, in the following proportions; vis. Wesleyan Methodists, 16; Primitive Methodists, 8; United Methodist Free Churches, 6; Methodist New Connexion, 4; Bible Christians, 4; Methodist Reform Union, 1; Independent Methodists, 1.

LOCAL PREACHERS.

- 1. The Conference receives the Report of the Committee.
- 2. The following scheme was finally adopted by the Conference of 1895 (Minutes, 1895, p. 311).

A. The District Local Preachers' Committee.

- (1) Each Synod shall have power to associate with the Members of the District Local Preachers' Committee other Ministers and Local Preachers interested in the subject; provided always that the Laymen so added shall not thereby become Members of the Synod.
- (2) Each Synod shall appoint a Ministerial Secretary and a Lay Secretary of the District Local Preachers' Committee.
- (3) At the September Local Preachers' Meeting in each Circuit, a Local Secretary shall be appointed, who shall forthwith forward his name and address, with the names and addresses of all the Local Preachers on the Circuit Plan, to the Lay Secretary of the District Local Preachers' Committee.
- (4) The Local Secretary shall, immediately after the March Local Preachers' Meeting, report to the District Local Preachers' Committee, on prepared forms, the various statistical facts relating to the Local Preachers in that Circuit.
- (5) The District Local Preachers' Committee shall prepare a Report based upon the Statistics so furnished, and relating to the work of the year, to be presented to the May Synod.
- (6) It shall be the duty of the District Local Preachers' Committee to enquire whether the directions of the Conference with regard to the mental and theological culture of Local

Preachers have been observed in the various Circuits of the District, and to take necessary steps to assist in carrying out those directions.

- (7) The District Local Preachers' Committee is empowered to establish and conduct Voluntary District Examinations of Local Preachers in Theology, Biblical Study, and Homiletics.
- (8) Subject always to the laws and usages of Methodism, the District Local Preachers' Committee shall endeavour to promote the interest and efficiency of Local Preachers' Meetings in all practicable ways, by suggesting subjects for discussion, providing deputations to visit such Meetings, and otherwise.
- (9) Subject to the laws and usages of Methodism, the District Local Preachers' Committee may initiate and promote arrangements providing for the ministrations of Local Preachers in Circuits other than their own, especially with a view to the advantage of the needlest and poorest Circuits; and may also undertake arrangements for Special Missions and Services where desired.

B. The Connexional Local Preachers' Committee.

- (1) Immediately after the May Synod the Reports of the District Local Preachers' Committees shall be sent to the Lay Secretary of the Connexional Committee, which shall report thereon to the Conference.
- (2) The Connexional Committee shall furnish a List of Books for guiding the Studies of Local Preachers. It shall also prepare a scheme of Voluntary Examinations and the necessary Examination papers.
- (3) A Lay Treasurer, a Ministerial and a Lay Secretary of the Connexional Committee shall be annually appointed by the Conference.

- (ii.) Mr. Moses Atkinson is re-appointed Treasurer of the Committee, and the Rev. John Bell (b) and Mr. J. Bamford Slack, B.A., are re-appointed Secretaries.
- 3. The subject of the Theological Reading of Local Preachers shall be dealt with by this Committee, together with the working out of the scheme of the Committee which reported to the Conference in 1894 on "A Course of Reading for Local Preachers." (See Appendix XI.)
- 4. A Circuit Plan, containing the full postal address of each Local Preacher, shall be forwarded every quarter by the Secretary of the Circuit Local Preachers' Meeting to the Lay Secretary of the District Local Preachers' Committee.
- 5. A Local Preacher who shall be adjudged a Bankrupt, or who shall make a composition with the general body of his Creditors, shall thereby be suspended from his office as a Local Preacher, until the Local Preachers' Meeting shall

have decided whether the circumstances of the case are such as to justify his continuance on the Plan.

6. The following changes are made in the Order and Form of Business for Local Preachers' Meetings as set forth in the *Minutes of Conference*, 1894.

Page 457, after Question I., for paragraph 2 substitute the following:

The Meeting has authority to make these enquiries. Should an objection affecting his standing on the Plan be formally made against a Local Preacher, the Meeting may proceed to consider it; and if, in its judgment, the objection is sustained, the Superintendent shall determine and pronounce the sentence; subject, however, to the right of appeal against the sentence on the part either of the persons accused, or of the Local Preachers' Meeting, to the District Synods and the Conference.

For paragraph 3, under the same question, the following:

A Local Preacher who has been aggrieved in any matter affecting his standing as a Local Preacher by a Superintendent acting in conjunction with an ordinary Local Preachers' Meeting shall have a right of appeal to a Local Preachers' Meeting specially convened to reconsider the case; and the finding of that Meeting as to matters of fact shall be final. The right to determine the sentence in this, as in all other judicial cases of discipline, is within the exclusive province of the Superintendent, after consultation with his colleagues. And against this sentence all parties shall have a right of appeal to the District Synod and the Conference. Any action, however, which may be taken by the Local Preachers' Meeting cannot interfere with the jurisdiction of the Leaders' Meeting, which is the Court charged with the consideration of questions which affect Church Membership.

7. The statistics required for the annual return to the District Local Preachers' Committee shall be furnished by the Superintendent to the Circuit Secretary, and the schedule shall bear the signatures of both.

WESLEYAN METHODIST TWENTIETH CENTURY FUND.

- 1. In the judgment of the Conference it is desirable to raise a special Connexional Fund for the maintenance and extension of the work of God at home and abroad, and the commencement of the Twentieth Century will afford a suitable occasion for the Wesleyan Methodist Church and its adherents to gratefully acknowledge the way in which God has led them, and also to prepare for further evangelistic, educational, and philanthropic service.
 - 2. The Conference therefore resolves:
- (1) A Special Connexional Fund, to be called the Wesleyan Methodist Twentieth Century Fund, shall be raised and applied to the Evangelistic, Educational, and Philanthropic purposes of our Church at home and abroad.
- (2) The amount which the Wesleyan Methodist Church and its adherents shall endeavour to raise shall be not less than One Million Guineas.
- (3) With a view to secure the co-operation of as large a number as possible of Wesleyan Methodists, whether members of the Church or adherents at home or abroad, the proposed Century Fund shall be raised by at least one million Methodists, who shall between January 1, 1899, and January 1, 1901, give or collect a sum of at least One Million Guineas.

Each person should aim at giving or collecting one guinea, thus preserving the fundamental principle of "one person one guinea," but it is believed that many will desire to subscribe sums greatly in excess of that amount. The General Committee is therefore instructed to make some provision whereby the wishes of such subscribers may be met.

- (4) The first day of the Twentieth Century, vis. January 1, 1901, shall be observed as a day of prayer and thanksgiving, when suitable devotional services shall be held in all our places of worship.
 - (5) A Roll shall be opened on January 1, 1899, upon which

there shall be entered the names of all subscribers and collectors, whether members of our Church, teachers or scholars in our Sunday and Day Schools, communicants, seatholders, or other worshippers and adherents or friends of Methodism at home and abroad.

The proposed Roll shall be closed on January 1, 1901, and the list of the donors in every Society or Circuit shall be read at the services on that day. The original Roll, upon which subscribers or collectors should, if possible, themselves inscribe their names, shall be preserved among the historical documents of the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

- (6) With a view to the successful initiation of this scheme, the Superintendents of Circuits are respectfully requested to secure the appointment of Circuit Committees at the approaching September quarterly meetings, who shall assist in its organisation, and such Committees are invited to prepare preliminary lists of the names and addresses of all our members and adherents in their respective Circuits.
- (7) A General Committee, to be summoned by the President of the Conference, shall meet in London in the autumn of this year, to make all necessary arrangements for organising the Fund; to define with greater detail its allocation; and to make such regulations for the collection of the Fund as in its judgment may be necessary.
- (8) The following shall be the objects of the Fund and the general scheme of allocation; but the General Committee shall have power to more exactly determine the amounts to be devoted to the several purposes named:
- (i.) To assist in the purchase of sites and the erection of Wesleyan Methodist places of worship, whether Chapels, Sunday Schools, or Mission Halls in any part of the United Kingdom, and Soldiers' and Sailors' Homes, and to help the completion of extension schemes already begun, £300,000.
- (ii.) For educational work in connexion with the Higher, Secondary, Elementary, or other Educational Institutions associated with the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and for

furthering the mental improvement and training of Local Preachers, £200,000.

- N.B.—Special provision shall be made for the erection of Day Schools in rural and other districts where at present Nonconformists are compelled to attend either Anglican or Roman Catholic schools, and also to provide for the reasonable requirements of pupil teachers who desire to be trained for their profession in a congenial religious atmosphere.
 - (iii.) For Foreign Missionary work, £,100,000.
- (iv.) For Home Missionary work, including Temperance work, £100,000.
- (v.) For the purchase of a suitable site in London in a convenient and prominent situation, and the erection thereon of a monumental Connexional Building, £250,000.
- (vi.) For the development of the work of the Children's Home, with a view to save all children of Methodist and other Nonconformist parentage from workhouse schools, and to provide also for the orphan children of Methodist Soldiers and Sailors, £50,000.
- (vii.) It is understood that to Ireland shall be made a grant, not less than the amount raised in Ireland, to be devoted to such objects as the Irish Conference may determine.
- (viii.) It is also understood that any Foreign District, which desires to co-operate with this effort, shall receive a grant not less than the amount locally raised; such grant to be applied for the benefit of the District in which the money is raised, under the direction of the Committee of the Missionary Society.
- (9) The several objects named shall share *pro rata* in the product of the Fund after necessary expenses have been met; but should the Fund yield more than the amount proposed, the surplus shall be devoted to these or other objects which may be determined by the General Committee.
- (10) Six Treasurers and Eight Honorary Secretaries shall be appointed, with a General Secretary, who shall be a Minister set apart for this work. These, together with twenty-

five other persons selected by the General Committee, shall form the Executive Committee.

- (11) The Conference, in determining upon this enterprise, is aware that it can only be accomplished by the generous and united effort of our people, richer and poorer, and earnestly appeals to all our Ministers, Church Officers, members, and adherents, at home or abroad, to unite cordially in the common effort. The Conference is deeply convinced that such an enterprise can only be successful if it is commenced and carried through, not in the spirit of sectarian pride and selfseeking, but in the spirit of prayer, consecration, and sincere anxiety for the extension of the kingdom of Christ. people are therefore urged to seek, contemporaneously with this financial effort, a renewed and richer outpouring of the Spirit of God, that the Church of our fathers may be equipped for the great spiritual tasks which the new century may bring to it in this country and throughout the world.

The Conference accordingly sanctions the purchase of the site, and the erection thereon of a large hall and other premises.

- 2. In view of the urgency of the case, and of the necessity for immediate provision for the congregation and Society, the Chapel Fund is specially authorised to deal with this as a regular case, although the usual conditions may not be fulfilled.
- 3. The Home Mission Fund is authorised to make a Loan to the Trustees of £15,000 from its invested Funds, on such terms and with such security as its Committee may deem satisfactory.
- 4. The Conference most earnestly commends this important scheme to the generous support of our people, both in England and Scotland.

Lay Agents in Circuits.—1. The Conference receives the Report of the Committee.

- 2. The Conference resolves:
- (1) All Lay Agents employed in our Circuits shall be members of the Wesleyan Methodist Society, and shall be accredited as such by the Superintendents of the Circuits from which they come.
- (2) A Lay Agent who is a fully accredited Local Preacher, having presented his Note of Removal and current Circuic Plan to the Superintendent of the Circuit in which he is to work as a Lay Agent, shall have his name placed at the foot of the list of Local Preachers on the Circuit Plan, unless the Local Preachers' Meeting, in exercise of the power given to it by the Conference (see *Minutes*, 1895, p. 436), shall decide to place his name in a higher position. The words "Hired Local Preacher," "Lay Agent," or otherwise, shall be added to his name on the plan; and while employed as a Lay Agent in the Circuit he shall be subject to the jurisdiction of the Local Preachers' Meeting.
- 3. Any Lay Agent desiring to offer himself as a Candidate for the Ministry must be proposed in and approved by the Quarterly Meeting of the Circuit of which he is a member, the directions concerning the residential qualification of Candidates for the Ministry being strictly observed.
- 4. If a Lay Agent is not a Local Preacher, his name shall appear on the Circuit Plan, but not among the names of the Preachers. He shall be subject to the jurisdiction of the Local Preachers' Meeting in the same manner as Exhorters are subjected to that jurisdiction by the provisions of our Discipline. (See *Minutes*, 1895, pp. 435, 438.)

Conference Sacramental Service.—The Conference Sacramental Service shall be held at the opening of the Representative Session, in lieu of the ordinary devotional exercises, and the Conference Arrangements Committee is instructed to make the necessary provision for the Service.

Circuit Missionary Accounts.—In no Circuit shall the Missionary Accounts for the year be closed until they have been passed by the Local or Circuit Missionary Committee, and duly signed by the Superintendent of the Circuit.

Open-Air Services.—The Conference directs the special attention of the Committee of Privileges to the prosecution and conviction of two of our Local Preachers under a new By-law of the Kent County Council, for singing and preaching in the open air, with a view

- 1. To bring about a repeal or amendment of this By-law.
- 2. To prevent its adoption by other County Councils.

Conference Railway Facilities.—The Conference directs the Committee of Privileges, either separately or in conjunction with the National Council of the Free Churches, and the Committee of the Church Congress, to seek an interview with the Railway Managers at the Clearing House, in order to obtain more favourable terms for persons travelling by railway to attend religious gatherings.

Third Jubilee of Kingswood School.—The Conference places on record its grateful sense of the divine blessing which has rested upon the School throughout the hundred and fifty years of its history, proving it to be, as its founder at the Dedication prayed it might become "a branch of the Lord's planting, a work of the Lord's hands." The prophecy of its early days has been abundantly fulfilled, and nearly six hundred "ambassadors of Christ" have been sent forth from its walls, while to all other departments of the service of the Church and of the State Kingswood has given an unbroken succession of loyal-hearted and efficient workers, who have been strong to serve their generation, ere "by the will of God" they "fell on sleep."

The Conference is confident that in the future as in the past the School will continue to justify its proud dedication: In GLORIAM DEI OPTIMI MAXIMI, IN USUM ECCLESIÆ ET REIPUBLICÆ, Insurance of Trust Property.—The Conference strongly urges upon all our Trustees the duty of insuring Trust property against loss by fire.

Local Preachers' Returns.—The returns for the District Local Preachers' Committee shall be compiled at the March Local Preachers' Meeting, and signed by the Superintendent of the Circuit and the Secretary of the Local Preachers' Meeting.

Roman Catholic University in Ireland.—Inasmuch as there is a probability that the Government will propose to establish a Roman Catholic University in Ireland, and to endow it out of public funds, the Conference, considering that such a scheme would be an unjustifiable departure from the principle of religious equality, directs the Committee of Privileges to cooperate, as far as practicable, with any action that the Committee of Privileges appointed by the Irish Conference may take in order to oppose such establishment of an endowed Denominational University.

The Opium Traffic.—As Opium Smoking in China is, by general and unquestionable testimony, doing great injury, both physical and moral, to the people, and as the connexion of the British Government with the Opium trade in China has led to a serious loss of British influence and prestige in that country, the Conference again declares its strong conviction that the British legislature ought at once to put a stop to the further export of Indian Opium to China.

Liquor Traffic in West Africa.—The Conference is strongly of opinion that in those districts of Africa where regulations exist for prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors to the natives, more stringent measures are necessary in order to secure their enforcement; also that the tariff, arranged at the Brussels Conference with a view to the restriction of the importation of spirits into certain parts of Africa, needs to be

revised in accordance with the provisions of the Act of Brussels, with a view to fixing it at such a minimum as will make it really restrictive; and that steps need to be taken to prevent the importation into Africa of alcohol in a highly concentrated form for the use of the natives. The Conference resolves that a Memorial be signed by the President and Secretary of the Conference, and forwarded to the Marquess of Salisbury, urging Her Majesty's Government to continue their exertions for securing an agreement amongst the Powers concerning measures for protecting the native races of Africa from the ravages of the liquor traffic.

SECTION III.

BUSINESS TRANSACTED PARTLY IN THE PASTORAL AND PARTLY IN THE REPRESENTATIVE SESSION.

METHODISM IN WALES.

- 1. The Conference receives the Report of the Committee.
- 2. The Conference confirms the creation of a Welsh Wesleyan Methodist Assembly of Wales, provisionally sanctioned last year, with the constitution published in Appendix X.

DISTRICT CONVENTIONS TO STRENGTHEN THE SPIRITUAL LIFE OF OUR CHURCHES.

- 1. The Conference cordially welcomes the proposal of the President, to devote a considerable portion of his time to holding meetings of Ministers and Church Officers in various centres during the year; and pledges itself to co-operate with him in his efforts to promote the strengthening of the spiritual life of the Church, and the seeking of greater power for the service of Christ,
- 2. The meetings at each centre shall be held on two consecutive days, and there shall be a two hours' session in the morning, the afternoon, and the evening of each day, respectively. The morning sessions shall be for Ministers only; the remaining sessions shall be allocated, as each District Committee may deem most convenient, among the following four groups: (i.) Class-leaders; (ii.) Local Preachers; (iii.) Circuit, Society, and Poor Stewards, Trustees, Organists, Choirmasters; (iv.) Sunday School, Wesley Guild, and Band of Hope workers.

- 3. The detailed arrangements at each centre shall be in the hands of a Committee to be appointed by the September Synod of the District concerned.

SECTION V.

STANDING ORDERS.

- I. Supplies, List of Reserve, Students.
- r. Supplies for Ministers—(1) Any Minister needing a Supply is directed to communicate with the Chairman of the District before applying to the President; and the Chairman is also directed to satisfy himself, by personal enquiry, that an efficient local Supply cannot be obtained.
- (2) Any Minister on whose behalf a Supply has been appointed shall retain the Supply for one month after he has given notice to the President that his services will no longer be required,—unless the President has employment for him sooner. And such Minister, when he gives notice to the President that, after a given date, the services of the Supply will be no longer required, shall, at the same time, notify the fact to the Chairman of the District.
- (3) The retiring President shall furnish to the Conference, on the second day of its Session, a list of all Ministers who have had Supplies during any part of the preceding year, with the dates in each case on which the Supply was sent and withdrawn. And on receiving this list, the Conference shall appoint a Committee to enquire whether these Ministers are physically competent to take Circuits.
- 2. Payment of Supplies.—(1) Every Probationer sent by the President as a Supply shall be paid at the rate of Thirty Guineas a year for the time he is in the Circuit; this allowance being in addition to Board and Lodging.
- (2) In regard to Travelling Expenses, a Probationer sent to a Circuit as a Supply is dealt with on the same principle as

one who is appointed by the Conference to his first Circuit. Once arrived in a Circuit as a Supply, he receives his travelling expenses from that Circuit to another when removed by the President during the year, or by the Conference at the end of the year.

- (3) In respect of payment, the year of a trained man on the President's List of Reserve appointed in connexion with, or immediately after, the Conference, shall reckon from the first day of September to the last day of August.
- 3. List of Reserve.—(1) The retiring President shall furnish to the Committee on Transfers a report as to the health and fitness for our work of those Probationers who have been, during the year, on the List of Reserve; the Committee to report to the Conference.
- (2) On the second day of each Conference the retiring President shall furnish a list of the names and addresses of the men on the List of Reserve, with particulars of their employment during the year. The list shall contain (a) the names of those sent out as Supplies by the President, with the date of appointment; (b) the names of those employed under private arrangement.
- (3) All applications for the services of Probationers on the List of Reserve shall be forwarded to the President of the Conference not later than July I in each year; and a Committee to classify the cases shall meet during the Sessions of each Conference.
- (4) Except in special cases, the President's List of Reserve shall consist of men who have been trained in the Theological Institution.
- 4. Students.—(1) Every Student who has completed his term of *three* years in the Theological Institution, and is duly certified by the Discipline Committee, shall be regarded as commencing his Probation at the Conference next ensuing.

If he receives an appointment at the Conference, or is called out by the President as a Supply before Christmas, he shall be entitled, after Ordination, to the usual allowances of an Ordained Minister.

But if not so appointed or called out, or if he shall be specially recommended to return to the Institution for a fourth year's course of study, he shall, in the year immediately following his Ordination, be entitled only to the allowances of an unmarried Minister. This resolution does not carry any disability with regard to other Funds than the Home Mission and Contingent Fund.

- (2) Students who have *not* completed their term at the Institution, but are called out to meet special emergencies, shall, when their services are no longer required by the President, return to the Institution and complete their term.
- (3) When it is decided by the Local and General Discipline Committees that the full period of three years' training at College should in the case of any Student be shortened, the ministerial probation of such Student shall not be reckoned as beginning until the Conference at which he would have completed his three years' training. This rule shall not apply to Students who have taken a degree in any of the Universities of the United Kingdom.
- (4) Students who have completed their term at the Institution, and were not called out during their third year by the President, and have not received appointments at the Conference, shall, if no other course be open to them, return to the Institution, and there await the call of the President.
- (5) Students who have completed their term at the Institution, but were called out during the previous year by the President, yet have not received appointments at the Conference, are under the care and at the cost of the Home Mission Committee.
- (6) Students who have completed their term at the Institution, and have been sent by the President as Supplies, shall, when their services are no longer required, be placed by the President under the direction of the Home Mission Committee, which shall be responsible for their maintenance;

the Committee shall, however, be entitled to a week's notice from the President before such Student receives another appointment.

- (7) The employment of Students as Supplies, otherwise than by the President, during their vacation, shall continue as heretofore to be matter of private arrangement, in regard to which neither the President nor the Home Mission Committee shall have responsibility; except in those special cases in which the Home Mission Committee may grant Supplies, for short periods, to Chairmen of Districts.
- (8) A proportion of the Missionary Students shall be trained in the Home Branches of the Theological Institution, and the vacancies so created at Richmond shall be filled by Candidates for the Home Work. Not more than one-third, nor fewer than one-fourth, of the Candidates allocated in each year to the Richmond Branch shall be Candidates for the Home Work; and an equal number of Candidates for the Foreign Work shall be distributed among the Home Branches. All Students for the Foreign Work who, having completed their term, may be placed on the List of Reserve, shall be provided for at the Richmond Branch.

(Minutes, 1812, 1857, 1876, 1879, 1885, 1886, 1887, 1888, 1889, 1891, 1897.)

II. The Connexion.

5. Title of the Connexion.—Having regard to the terms used in our Trust Deeds and other Legal Documents, it is not possible for the Conference to alter the title of the Connexion as it appears on the front page of the *Minutes of the Conference*. The Conference declares, however, that the title hitherto used is not, and never has been, inconsistent with the assertion for "the People called Methodists" of a true and proper position as a Church, with all the authorities, privileges, and responsibilities belonging to the New Testament Church; and in this view of our principles and of the facts of the case, the Con-

ference, so far from discouraging, distinctly approves of the general and popular use of the term, "The Wesleyan Methodist Church." (Minutes, 1891, p. 321.)

- 6. Ministerial Members of Connexional Committees. No Minister, who is not an Officer of a Departmental Committee, shall remain upon that Committee as a Member more than six consecutive years, unless he shall have been nominated for a further appointment thereon by the vote of four-fifths of the Members of the Committee present. (Minutes, 1882, p. 383.)
- 7. Lay Members of Connexional Committees.—(1) A certain number of Lay Gentlemen, being at least one-sixth of the number of Lay Members of each Departmental Committee, shall annually retire from each Committee by rotation; the same persons being ineligible for immediate re-appointment, except in special cases, and after nomination for such reappointment by the vote of four-fifths of the members of the Committee present. (Minutes, 1882, p. 383.)
- (2) A complete list of the Lay Members of each Connexional Committee, with their postal addresses, shall be handed to the Secretary of the Conference for insertion in the *Minutes*. (*Minutes*, 1892, p. 319.)
- 8. Lists of Committees to Appear in the Conference Agenda.—All Lists of Committees which are to be considered by the Nomination Committee shall, as far as possible, be printed in the Agenda for the Conference; the names of new members being printed in italics, and those of members nominated for re-appointment by a four-fifths majority being distinguished by an asterisk; care being taken to give the Christian name and address of each Layman. (Minutes, 1890, p. 292.)
- 9. New Members of Connexional Committees.—The Secretaries of Departments shall inform all new Members, Laymen and Ministers, of their appointment upon Connexional Committees. (Minutes, 1890, p. 292.)

10. Custody of Connexional Documents.—In addition to the Journals and Daily Records of the Conference, the Reports of Committees meeting during the Conference, and the Minutes of the several District Synods, which are kept at the Conference Office, the following Documents shall also be preserved: The printed Agenda of the Conference; the Minutes of the Committee on Memorials and Suggestions from year to vear, with the Documents laid before that Committee, and the Resolutions of the Conference thereon; the Reports of special Committees or Commissions appointed by the Conference: any legal opinion obtained from time to time by the direction of the Conference; and a Record of all Legacies and Funds left to the Connexion, of the place where the Trust Deeds are deposited, with the names of the Trustees, and the provisions (if any) for the renewal of the Trust; and when the Legacies have been finally disposed of, the Minute Books of the Trustees, showing the arrangements made: with other Documents the safe custody of which the Conference may hereafter direct. (Minutes, 1882, pp. 287, 288.)

III. The Conference.

11. Induction of the President.—The first Session shall be occupied with constituting the Conference, and with such other miscellaneous business as may be convenient (the Ex-President, if the newly elected President should so desire, occupying the chair). The afternoon Session following shall be open to our people, under the customary regulations, until half-past four, and shall be occupied with the induction of the President into his office, the delivery of his address, and devotional exercises.

The Arrangements Committee is directed to reserve the body of the Chapel strictly for the members of the Conference. (*Minutes*, 1892, p. 217.)

12. Two Sessions Daily.—With a view to the dispatch of business, there shall be two Sessions daily. (*Minutes*, 1886, p. 297.)

- 13. Open Session.—An open Session for the reception of Representatives from other Conferences shall be held on the evening of the first day of the Representative Session. (*Minutes*, 1890, p. 422.)
- 14. Scrutineers of Votes.—(1) At each Conference, in Pastoral Session, a Convener of Scrutineers shall be appointed to take charge of the voting for the Legal Conference, and for the offices of President and Secretary, at the succeeding Conference; and such Convener shall be an exofficio member of the Pastoral Session of the Conference for which he is elected.
- (2) The Committee of Scrutineers, annually appointed, shall consist of not less than twenty, and shall make all arrangements for the collecting and counting of votes. (*Minutes*, 1892, p. 217.)
- 15. Chairman of Memorials Committee.—The Ex-President, year by year, shall be ex officio the Chairman of the Committee on Memorials and Suggestions. (Minutes, 1895, p. 216.)
- r6. Character of Ministers and Preachers on Trial.—In response to the enquiry in the Conference, "Is there any objection to any of our Ministers or Preachers on Trial?" the names of the Districts only shall be called, the Chairman of each District then giving the required information. The right to challenge any name, or bring a charge against any Minister, shall not be affected by this regulation. (Minutes, 1887, p. 289.)

Subjects discussed under this question are to be regarded as strictly private and confidential.

17. Ministers who have ceased to be Recognised by the Conference.—No Preacher, excluded for immorality, or who resigns his connexion with the Conference while under charges which affect his moral character, shall at any subsequent period be allowed to be a Local Preacher, Class-leader, or even a private Member of Society, without the consent of the Conference, previously obtained. (Minutes, 1897, p. 243.)

18. Junior Ministers becoming Supernumeraries for One Year.— Ministers who have travelled not more than twenty-one years, and have lost their health, may be allowed to retire for one year. In addition to the Allowances payable from the Annuitant Society and the Connexional Funds, such Ministers may, if in necessitous circumstances, receive for that year a sum not exceeding £80; of which one-half shall be provided by the Home Mission and Contingent Fund, the other half being paid by the Auxiliary Fund. (Minutes, 1878, pp. 233, 234.)

When a Minister who becomes a Supernumerary for one year is not a member of the Annuitant Society, the extra Grant from the Auxiliary Fund shall be less by the amount which would have been due to him from the Annuitant Society. (Minutes, 1887, p. 261.)

Each case shall be examined by a Mixed Committee of seven Members, who shall be appointed by the Conference; namely, the Ex-President, three Ministers, and three Laymen.

Should the Conference deem it indispensable, the Grant may be allowed for a second year. (*Minutes*, 1878, p. 234.)

- 19. Superannuation and the Legal Conference.—Ministers who have ceased to be members of the Legal Conference on the ground of superannuation cease also at the same time to be members of the Representative Session, unless they have been previously chosen as Representatives by the May Synods, or appointed by the preceding Conference to represent Departments. (Minutes, 1897, p. 244.)
- 20. Temporary Supernumeraryship in Relation to the Legal Conference.—In the case of a member of the Legal Conference who has been permitted to retire for one or for two years, he shall not thereby cease to be a member of the Legal Conference provided he then (that is to say, at the end of the first or second year) returns to the full work; and he shall remain a member of the Legal Conference for two years after becoming a Supernumerary permanently. (Minutes, 1890, p. 212; revised, 1895.)

- 21. Compulsory Supernumeraryship: Financial Arrangements.—
 (1) When the Conference has decided that a Minister shall not be appointed to a Circuit for any other reason than physical incompetence, his case shall be considered by a Special Committee, to be appointed by the Conference in its Representative Session. This Committee shall determine whether any, and if any what, annual allowances shall be paid to him; or whether any, and if any what, sums shall be offered to him on condition of his retirement from the Ministry. The Committee shall further advise the Conference as to the sources whence such payments shall be made in each case.
- (2) Representatives of the following Funds shall be among the persons appointed on the Committee: The Auxiliary Fund, Home Mission and Contingent Fund, and Children's Fund in both its branches.
- (3) The Members of the Annuitant Society shall be asked to treat Ministers who may retire from the Ministry under these arrangements, in the matter of compensation, as though they had resigned. (*Minutes*, 1896, p. 321.)
- 22. Compulsory Supernumeraryship in Relation to the District Synod.—In the case of any Minister who has been made a Supernumerary on the ground of either (a) discipline or (b) difficulty in finding him a Circuit, no District Synod shall recommend his re-appointment unless some Circuit in that District is willing to receive him, or he shall have received an invitation to a Circuit in another District. (Minutes, 1892, p. 218.)
- 23. Supernumeraries returning to the Full Work.—The Conference resolves that in all cases where it is recommended that Supernumerary Ministers shall return to the full work, enquiry and report shall be made by the Committee appointed at Conference to examine the cases of those Ministers who have had supplies during the year. (Minutes, 1897, p. 244.)
- 24. Ministers without Pastoral Charge.—(1) Any Minister wishing to maintain his ministerial status whilst holding no

definite appointment to a Circuit or a Department, and without becoming a Supernumerary, shall apply for permission through the District Synod to the Conference, which shall decide the case after a full examination by a Special Committee.

- (2) Such Minister shall continue to be in every way subject to our discipline, including the usual enquiries as to character and doctrine.
- (3) No such Minister shall receive any payment from the Auxiliary Fund during, or on account of, the years in which he shall occupy the position herein described; and he shall pay the yearly assessments to the Fund for the Maintenance and Education of Ministers' Children on the same scale as Ministers appointed to Departments; and he shall then continue to receive the benefit of those Funds in the ordinary course.
- (4) The name of every such Minister shall stand upon the *Minutes* in connexion with some Circuit, and following his name shall be these words: "resides in this Circuit without pastoral charge." Nevertheless, he shall not, as a Minister, be a member of the Quarterly Meeting or of any Leaders' Meeting in the Circuit. (*Minutes*, 1888, p. 215.)
- (5) In the case of a Member of the Legal Conference having been entered on the *Minutes* as without pastoral charge, in conformity with the Resolutions of the Conference of 1888, the Conference resolves that, at the expiration of four years from the commencement of such an arrangement, he shall cease to be a member of the Legal Conference.

The effect of this Resolution shall not be retrospective. (Minutes, 1890, p. 212.)

- 25. Supernumeraries or other Ministers Resident Abroad.—
 (1) No Minister is allowed to be absent from the country during a great part of the year without the consent of the Yearly Conference, or, in case of emergency, of the President, who shall report the case to the ensuing Conference.
- (2) Any Minister having permission to reside abroad shall have such permission annually renewed.

- (3) If any Minister remain abroad for more than one year, he shall be required either to make arrangements with the officers of our Connexional Funds, with a view to retiring from the English work, or to furnish the Conference annually with a satisfactory report from some other Methodist Conference in recognised relation with this Conference.
- (4) If any Minister shall enter into business, or shall accept office of emolument of any kind, during his residence abroad, he is required, without delay, to notify the fact to the Chairman of the District where his name appears on the Stations.
- (5) In all such cases the existing Rule which requires the presence of a Minister at the Annual District Synod shall be held to be binding, unless his absence has been expressly sanctioned in accordance with the foregoing resolutions; and even in that case he is required to furnish a statement in due time containing an answer to the question in the Order and Form of Business in District Synods as to his continued belief of our doctrines.
- (6) Any Minister having permission to reside abroad shall furnish a report as to his ministerial conduct from the proper authority, as defined in the above, or in the letter from the President giving the required permission.
- (7) A list of all such Ministers shall be annually printed in the *Minutes of Conference* at the end of the Stations. (*Minutes*, 1888, p. 215; 1893, p. 362.)
- 26. Obituaries of Deceased Ministers.—Secretaries of District Synods are directed to forward copies of the Obituaries of Deceased Ministers to the Convener of the Committee on Obituaries, immediately after the Annual Meeting of the Synod. (Minutes, 1892, p. 217.)
- 27. Memorial Service for Deceased Ministers.—(I) The consideration of the records of deceased brethren shall be regarded and observed as a strictly religious service; and, whilst this solemn business is being transacted, no Committees shall meet.

- (2) The obituaries of deceased Ministers received by the District Synods shall be revised by a Special Committee, to be appointed at the preceding Conference.
- (3) The obituaries thus revised shall be printed for the use of the Conference, under the direction of the Special Committee; and the official reading of these records shall be discontinued.
- (4) The obituary notices of Ministers who have died since the May District Synods shall be revised by the Special Committee; and, if possible, be printed and presented at the same time as those which have been submitted to the District Synods.
- (5) The Conference shall, as a rule, transact this solemn business on the Tuesday morning of the third week of its Sessions.
- (6) The list of the names of deceased Ministers shall be read by the Secretary of the Conference. (Minutes, 1891, p. 230.)
- 28. Memorandum of Agreement between the Conference and Candidates from other Churches.—The Memorandum of Agreement between the Conference and Candidates from other Conferences and Churches shall apply in all particulars to married men who are accepted in the ordinary way as Candidates for the Ministry; and the payments required therein shall be made, and the privileges described therein shall begin to be enjoyed, in both cases, at the time of their admission into Full Connexion with the Conference. (Minutes, 1882, p. 289.)
- 29. Conference Plan.—The Superintendents of those Circuits in which the Conference may, from year to year, assemble, shall, with the previous approbation of the President, complete and print, not later than June 15 in each year, a Plan of the order of preaching in the principal chapels during the Sessions; and shall also, on or before the above date, send

to every person whom they have appointed to preach in those chapels a copy of the Plan.

Every Minister so appointed is responsible to the Conference for the fulfilment of his appointment. (*Minutes*, vol. vi. [1827], p. 291.)

30. Committee on Appeals and other Cases.—At each Conference, the President shall nominate, not later than the second day, a Committee of twenty-one members of the Conference, to whom shall be referred, without discussion (1) all cases needing further enquiry touching the character of Ministers or Probationers, immediately after the reading of the Minutes of District Synods thereupon; (2) any notice of charge or appeal relating thereto; or (3) any other matter which the Conference may so refer.

Any complainant or appellant, or any person under enquiry, may object to one in three of the members of the said Committee sitting on his case; and the President shall then appoint some other member of the Conference to act instead of the member so objected to.

Special cases to be decided upon by the Conference may be referred to the whole Committee; but it shall, for ordinary purposes, be divided into three sections, for each of which a Convener shall be appointed, who shall be responsible for preparing the business of the Committee. (*Minutes*, vol. xix. [1873], p. 202.)

- 31. Appeals in Cases of Discipline.—No appeal shall be received after the completion of the year following the Conference immediately succeeding the act of discipline, except by special decision of the Conference. (*Minutes*, 1891, p. 229.)
- 32. Ministers under Affiliated Conferences.—(1) British Ministers who have elected to remain in Full Connexion with the Yearly Conference whilst continuing to be employed under an Affiliated Conference must be held to be absolutely subject to the Affiliated Conference in all matters connected with the

work and within the limits of that Conference; but the question of their continued connexion with the Yearly Conference can be determined only by the vote of the Yearly Conference.

- (2) Any British Minister who has elected to enter into Full Connexion with an Affiliated Conference, or who may hereafter so enter, must be regarded as having thereby resigned his connexion with the Yearly Conference; and the fact of such resignation shall be entered on the Journal of the Yearly Conference.
- (3) Ministers who were not sent out from England, but were taken into the Ministry in the Districts now belonging to Affiliated Conferences, and also Native Ministers, were intended to be absolutely subject to the jurisdiction of their respective Affiliated Conferences. The Conference declares that they are so subject to the Affiliated Conferences, and that they have ceased to be in connexion with the Yearly Conference; and directs that complete lists of those Ministers shall be entered on the Journal of the Yearly Conference. (Minutes, 1891, p. 231.)
- 33. Vacancies among Lay Members of the Conference.—In the event of one or more of the Eighteen Laymen elected by previous Conferences being unable to attend the Conference, he or they shall inform the President at least one week before the date fixed for the commencement of the Representative Session. The President shall furnish the information to the Secretaries of the Nomination Committee, and that Committee shall nominate a person or persons to fill the vacancies thus created; such nominations being submitted to the Conference at the commencement of the Representative Session, which shall be requested to elect the person or persons so nominated.

In the event of a vacancy arising by appointment to a Connexional Treasurership, or by death, nominations shall be made in the same way; and the person elected shall, as regards retirement and re-election, be subject to the rules applying to the person whose place he takes. (Minutes, 1897, p. 340.)

- 34. Obituaries of Ministers of Affiliated Conferences.—On the death of any Minister of an Affiliated Conference who had a right of return to this country, an obituary shall be inserted in the *Minutes* of the Yearly Conference. (*Minutes*, 1890, p. 211.)
- 35. Native Ministers and the Yearly Conference.—For the Resolutions of the Conference on this subject, see *Minutes*, 1895, pp. 217-220.

IV. The Stationing Committee.

- 36. Election of Representative in District Synod. The Minister who shall be the Representative of any District to the Stationing Committee shall be chosen by the united votes of the Ministers and Laymen who are members of the District Synod. (*Minutes*, vol. i. [1791], p. 256; vol. xviii. [1870], p. 154.)
- 37. Preparations for the Stationing Committee.—(1) As soon as possible after the Annual District Synod, each Representative shall be furnished by the Secretary of the Conference with a list of all Ministers for whom arrangements have not been made, and of all Circuits in like case; the information necessary to compile this list being sent by the Representatives to the Secretary of the Conference not later than June 1; such lists to contain complete information, and to be regarded as private and confidential. (Minutes, 1892, p. 218.)
- (2) The Representative of each District shall send to the Secretary of the Conference, not later than June 25 in each year, upon a prepared Schedule, complete lists of—
 - (a) The invitations accepted by Ministers in his District;
- (b) The arrangements provisionally made for the appointment of Ministers to Circuits in his District; and
- (c) All Ministers in his District for whom no arrangement has been made.

Also, a list of all Ministers to be transferred from the Foreign to the Home Stations shall, at the same time, be fur-

nished by the Missionary Secretaries to the Secretary of the Conference.

From these lists the Secretary of the Conference shall compile, and cause to be printed in a convenient form for use in the Stationing Committee, a Preliminary Draft of Stations embodying all arrangements thus provisionally made; and also a separate list of all Ministers for whom provisional arrangements have not been made; and a copy of these shall be furnished to each Member of the Stationing Committee, in London, on the Monday before the meeting of that Committee. (Minutes, vol. xix. [1875], p. 709.)

- 38. Regulations concerning the Stationing Committee.
- (1) The Stationing Committee shall, from year to year, hold its first Session in London.
 - (2) The appointments made shall not be printed day by day.
 - (3) The Stations shall be printed in the Conference Town.
- (4) The First Draft of Stations shall be an absolutely confidential document until the Representatives' Copies are ready for the post.

Should any Minister be officially reported as under discipline and suspended until the Conference, his name shall not appear on the First Draft of Stations.

- (5) Probationers on the List of Reserve, and Students leaving the Institution, who are eligible for appointment, shall be entitled to a copy of the First Draft and of the Final Draft of Stations.
- (6) Each Representative shall send to the Secretary of the "Conference Arrangements Committee" two sets of Addressed Wrappers, for the First Draft and the Final Draft, for the Ministers and Circuit Stewards in his District, and for Six other Laymen—Members of the District Synod; the cost of which shall be refunded by the "Conference Arrangements Committee." (Minutes, 1888, p. 317.)
- 39. Extra Sitting of the Stationing Committee.—After the first reading of the Stations, the Committee shall, when it is

deemed expedient, retire for the further consideration of the Stations. (Minutes, 1888, p. 317.)

- 40. The Ex-President and the Stationing Committee.—The retiring President shall be, ex officio, a Member of the Stationing Committee during the sittings of Conference. (Minutes, 1888, p. 316.)
- 41. Stations in the Conference.—(1) The Stations shall be presented twice in the Conference, for a First and a Final Reading.
- (2) In the First Reading of the Stations, the names of the Ministers shall not be read out one by one, but the Secretary shall call the names of the Circuits, and any member of the Conference shall be at liberty to question, or raise a discussion upon, any proposed appointment. In the Final Reading, the usage shall be observed of making changes only when all parties are agreed. (Minutes, 1892, p. 218.)
- 42. Re-appointment of Ministers to Circuits.—The term during which a Minister must be absent from a Circuit in England or Wales, before he can be re-appointed, shall be three years. (Minutes, 1889, p. 304.) He may then return, provided that the invitation of the Circuit Quarterly Meeting is substantially unanimous. (Minutes, 1890, p. 207.)

In relation to Scotland, a similar resolution was adopted in 1866. (*Minutes*, vol. xvi. [1866], p. 589.)

- 43. A "Supply" in relation to a Third Year Appointment.—A Probationer sent by the President, before Christmas, as a Supply, is not thereby disqualified for appointment for a third year to the Circuit where he served as a Supply. (Minutes, 1887, pp. 193, 194.)
- 44. University Degrees.—(1) For the future, no Minister shall be entitled to have his Degree printed in the *Minutes* until the approval of the Probationers' Examination Committee has been obtained.

- (2) In the case of every Degree printed in the *Minutes*, the source of the Degree shall be stated, except in the case of that of Doctor of Divinity received before the Conference of 1895.
- (3) Degrees obtained from a Foreign University, by means of examinations conducted in this country, shall not be printed in the *Minutes*. (*Minutes*, 1893, pp. 227, 228; 1895, p. 225.)
- 45. Numbering of Circuits and Stations.—(1) Except those in which no Minister's House is provided, all Stations appearing in the *Minutes* shall be numbered.
- (2) The Minister appointed to any Station without a number is the Superintendent, and is therefore entitled to preside in the Quarterly Meetings and in the Trustees' Meetings; but he shall, as heretofore, act under the direction of the Chairman of the District. (Minutes, 1886, p. 204.)

V. Departments.

- 46. Designations and Nominations for Appointment to Departmental Offices.—Twelve months before the end of any term of Departmental Office, the Committee in charge of the Department shall submit to the Representative Session of the Conference the names of three Ministers in nomination for that office; of whom the Officer for the time being may, or may not, be one. The Pastoral Session of the Conference shall designate for appointment one of the three nominated by the Representative Session. A similar course shall be pursued in cases of emergency arising before the Conference, which involve immediate appointment. In case of an emergency arising after the close of the Representative Session, the Pastoral Session shall have the right to appoint without a previous nomination. (Minutes, 1886, p. 204; 1890, p. 423.)
- 47. Method of Nominating Ministers for Designation or Appointment to Departmental Offices.—(1) On the presentation of three names by the Committee of any Department,

- according to rule, for designation or appointment, the Conference, in its Representative Session, shall take at least one ballot; and then, if an absolute majority has been secured, and the Conference thinks fit, it may by open vote pass on the result of the first ballot to the Pastoral Session.
- (2) When a ballot is taken, the Committee of Scrutineers shall consist of not less than twenty persons, and shall make all arrangements for the collection and counting of votes. (*Minutes*, 1892, p. 312.)
- 48. Elections to Departmental Offices.—In any new appointment to a Departmental Office, the Minister elected shall have a clear majority of the total number of votes cast; and when such majority is not obtained on the first ballot, a second ballot shall be taken on the first two—or, if necessary, the first three—names on the list which have the largest number of votes. (Minutes, 1883, p. 183.)
- 49. Vacancies among Lay Members of the Conference.—If any Treasurer of a Connexional Fund be unable to attend the Conference, the Committee of the Fund in question shall, at its last meeting previous to the Conference, elect one of its Lay members to represent the Fund at that Conference, in the place of the Treasurer. (Minutes, 1897, p. 340.)
- 50. Schedules from Departments.—As it is obviously desirable that the Committees appointed by the Conference to manage the several Departments of the business of the Connexion, in the intervals of its Session, should be furnished with all necessary statistical information on the matters of business severally confided to their care, the Conference authorises them, through their appointed Officers, to send, when they deem it expedient, suitable Circulars and Schedules to the Superintendents, or to the Chairmen of Districts, as the case may require; and directs the Superintendents and Chairmen duly to return such Schedules properly filled up. (Minutes, yol. ix. [1840], p. 105.)

VI. Army and Navy Work.

- 51. Instructions to Chairmen and Superintendents in Foreign Districts.—The Chairmen and Superintendents of our Foreign Mission Districts and Stations where there are Garrison and Naval Ports are instructed to make such arrangements with the Naval and Military authorities as may be necessary for the benefit of Methodist Soldiers and Seamen, in concert with the Army and Navy Sub-Committee. (Minutes, 1889, p. 317.)
- 52. Reports and Returns to District Synods.—All Ministers working for the benefit of Soldiers and Sailors in Stations where Methodist Homes already exist, or shall be established, shall include in their quarterly reports an account of the work done in the Homes; and at the May Synods the financial condition of such Homes shall be reported, as in the case of other Trust properties. (Minutes, 1887, p. 227.)

The following information shall be presented from each of our Military and Naval Stations to the May Synods; together with a Report of the work done for the benefit of our Soldiers and Sailors:

- (1) The number of declared Methodists in the Army and Royal Navy, including the Coastguard, taken for December 31 of each year.
- (2) The number of Members of Society in the Army and Royal Navy, including the wives and children of Soldiers and Seamen.
- (3) The average attendance at divine Service during the year.
- (4) The amount of capitation and other official payments for the year.

In the case of Home Stations, these Reports and Returns shall be submitted to the District Home Mission Committee, which shall present them, with needful remarks thereupon, to the Synod. (*Minutes*, 1888, p. 311.)

- 53. Soldiers' and Sailors' Homes.—In addition to the Connexional sanction already required by our Rules before any property can be acquired for Methodist purposes, Ministers or other persons connected with our Societies contemplating the erection or acquisition of a Soldiers' or Sailors' Home shall communicate with the Army and Navy Sub-Committee; and no binding arrangements shall be entered into until the written consent of the Home Mission Committee and of the Foreign Missionary Committee respectively shall have been received. (Minutes, 1887, p. 227.)
- 54. Army and Navy Ministers in relation to Circuit Work.—Ministers who are appointed to Army and Navy Work are not to be considered as Ministers of the Circuit in which they may be stationed, so as to be claimed for Circuit work, unless special arrangements be made with the Army and Navy Sub-Committee. After their proper work has been efficiently done, they may give such help to the Circuit as they can, but only by arrangement in writing between the Superintendent of the Circuit and the Army and Navy Sub-Committee. Their personal conduct is to be under the cognisance of the Superintendent of the Circuit and the District Synod, subject to the before-mentioned conditions. (Minutes, 1888, p. 311.)
- 55. Capitation Payments and Pastoral Duties. Wherever capitation payments are received on behalf of our Methodist Soldiers and Seamen, the pastoral duties which are entailed thereby shall be strictly fulfilled, and every facility and encouragement given to the men, their wives, and families to become attached to the services of the chapels in which, by these payments, they are now seatholders. (*Minutes*, 1888, p. 311.)

VII. Synods.

56. District Synods, 1899.—The Annual Meetings of the several District Synods shall be held between May 7 and 14, with the exception of those of the North Wales, South Wales,

Lincoln, Hull, Isle of Man, and Scotland Districts. (*Minutes*, vol. viii. [1837], p. 224.) The Scotland Synod shall be held in the week following Sunday, April 30.

- 57. Isle of Man District.—It shall be a part of the business of the September Synod of the Isle of Man District to call the attention of Superintendents, and other Ministers who may be responsible, to the Regulations concerning certain Quarterly Returns to the Registrar-General of the island, according to the provisions of the "Dissenters' Marriage Act Amendment Act, 1885," of the Isle of Man. (Minutes, 1885, p. 285.)
- 58. Election of Ministers to attend the Conference in its Representative Session.—(1) The election shall be by ballot, after nomination, from among the whole number of Ministers in any District who desire to attend the Conference.
- (2) The Ministers so elected shall have permission to attend the Conference in its Pastoral Session.
- (3) The Ministers necessary to complete the number permitted to attend the Conference in its Pastoral Session shall then be elected.
- (4) In the event of any Minister elected to attend the Conference in its Representative Session offering to provide for himself, his election shall not thereby be rendered void. (*Minutes*, 1886, p. 199.)
- 59. Election of Lay Representatives to the Conference.—No Layman shall be eligible as a Representative, whether elected annually by the Conference, or by the May Synod, unless he be a Member of Society of five years' continuous standing, and, at the time of his election by the Conference, or nomination in the Synod, a holder of office as a Trustee of Connexional Property, a Member of a Circuit Quarterly Meeting, or a Member of a Synod. Any Layman nominated in a Synod must be a Member of Society in some Circuit within that District. (Minutes, vol. xx. [1877], p. 420.)

The election of Lay Representatives to the Conference shall be by the separate vote of the Laymen, taken by ballot after nomination, in the May Synods; such nomination to be by the Lay Members only. (*Minutes*, vol. xx. [1877], p. 421.)

60. Substitutes for Representatives to Conference.—In the event of one or more of the Ministers or Laymen elected to attend the Conference in its Representative Session being unable to fulfil their appointments, they shall inform the Chairman of the District before the beginning of the Representative Session, and their place or places shall then be taken by the person or persons who received the highest number of votes next to those elected. (Minutes, 1895, p. 325.)

VIII. Chairmen.

- 61. Election of Chairmen of Districts.—In the appointment of a Chairman of a District, the Minister elected shall have a clear majority of the total number of votes cast, and according to the Standing Order relating to Elections to Departmental Offices. See Standing Order, No. 48. (Minutes, 1886, p. 295.)
- 62. Resolutions on Pastoral Work and Probationers in their First Circuit.—A copy of the "Resolutions on Pastoral Work" shall be presented, under the direction of the Chairman of each District, to every Probationer on his first appointment to a Circuit. (Minutes, 1885, p. 183.)
- 63. Discipline of Methodism.—The Chairmen of Districts are enjoined to make particular enquiries at the May Synods in reference to the several points of discipline specified in the first Section of the Answer to Question XXVIII. in the Minutes of 1825. (Minutes, vol. vi. [1825], p. 65.)
- 64. Home Missionary Ministers.—A special enquiry shall be made at the May Synods whether the Regulations for the employment of Home Missionary Ministers, adopted by the Conference, have been faithfully observed in the Circuits

to which Home Missionary Ministers are appointed; and a Report in each case shall be made to the Conference. (*Minutes*, vol. xv. [1862], p. 327.)

- 65. Additional or Fewer Ministers.—All applications for additional Ministers, or for the reduction of the number of Ministers in any Circuit, shall be considered by the District Home Mission Committee, which shall report thereon to the May Synod. (*Journal*, 1894.)
- 66. Interchanges of Ministers.—The expense of interchanges appointed by the Conference between Ministers residing in various Circuits shall in no case fall upon the Ministers themselves, but shall be provided by the Circuits concerned, under the direction of the Synod. (Minutes, 1878, p. 252.)
- 67. Neutrals in Voting.—The Conference resolves that in all voting upon cases of discipline, or upon Candidates proposed for the Ministry, in the Synods, the number of neutrals shall be recorded. (*Minutes*, 1894, p. 226.)
- 68. Trial Sermons of Candidates for Ordination.—Candidates for Ordination shall, at or before the May Synod, preach in the presence of three Ministers of the District, who shall report, in writing, to the Synod. (*Minutes*, vol. xviii. [1871], p. 403.)
- 69. Examination of Candidates for Ordination.—(1) Before any Probationer, having travelled four years, is recommended by his Synod for admission into Full Connexion, he shall undergo a careful examination, by the Chairman of that Synod, respecting his acquaintance with Wesley's Works in general, and especially with his Sermons and his Notes on the New Testament. (Minutes, vol. iv. [1815], p. 122.) This oral Examination may be omitted if the report on the paper on Wesley's Works (see p. 228, § (4) v.) is satisfactory.
- (2) Every such Preacher shall also be examined as to his knowledge of the Constitution of Methodism and the Administration of Circuits; and as to whether, after four years' experience of its working, he still approves our discipline.

- 70. Probationers and Wesley's Works.—Those Probationers who do not already possess Wesley's Works are required to procure them during the period of their Probation, and shall be allowed to pay for them to our Book Steward by such instalments as may best suit their convenience. (Minutes, 1882, p. 224.)
- 71. Probationers' Reading.—The Examination Committee shall prepare and send to each Probationer, early in October, a list of books specially recommended for the reading of Preachers on Trial, some of which shall have particular reference to the scriptural doctrine of the Church. With this shall be sent a classified form on which the Probationer shall describe his reading, theological and general, for the year. This form is to be sent in to the Chairman of the District at least a week before the meeting of the May Synod. When the Book Lists of Preachers on Trial are under consideration in the Synods, the Chairmen shall note how far their reading has been guided by the recommended list. (Minutes, 1897, p. 221.)
- 72. Probationers and the Synods.—Whenever practicable, Probationers shall preach during the Synods. (*Minutes*, vol. xviii. [1871], p. 403.)
- 73. Probationers returning from the Mission Field.—The Conference directs that if a Probationer enter upon the Home Work after spending part of his probation on the Foreign Field, the Missionary Secretaries shall furnish the Chairman of the District to which he is appointed with a report upon each year of the probation which has been spent abroad. This report shall be laid by the Chairman before the May Synod. (Minutes, 1896, p. 229.)
- 74. Probation of University Graduates.—Candidates for the Ministry who have obtained a Degree in any University of the United Kingdom shall not, of necessity, spend the full term of three years in the Theological Institution, but, on the

recommendation of their Tutors, the term of their residence may be shortened. And in such case, their Probation shall commence at the Conference next ensuing. (*Minutes*, 1886, p. 203; see also *Minutes*, 1895, p. 334, § 8.)

- 75. Administration of the Sacraments by Probationers.—Any application for a dispensation to a Probationer to administer the Sacraments shall be made to the President through the Chairman of the District. (*Minutes*, 1892, p. 219.)
- 76. Candidates for the Ministry.—(1) Those Candidates for the Ministry who are recommended for Admission on Trial shall, at or before the time of the May Synod, preach in the presence of at least three of the Ministers of the Synod, to be selected by the Chairman, exclusive of the Superintendent by whom the Candidates respectively are proposed; and a special report of the Sermons shall be made in the District Synod, and immediately forwarded, in writing, to the Secretaries of the Committee for the Examination of Candidates. (Minutes, vol. x. [1844], p. 91.)
- (2) Arrangements shall be made by the May Synods for the hearing of each Candidate by two Ministers of the District, in addition to those who have heard him before his recommendation by the Synod; and such Ministers shall immediately forward their Report to the Rev. Peter Thompson, 583, Commercial Road, London, E. (Minutes, 1889, p. 194.)
- N.B.—Three different trial Sermons are required from each Candidate; two preached, and one sent in manuscript. (Minutes, 1889, p. 193.)
- (3) Except when the Conference directs otherwise, accepted Candidates shall be sent forthwith to the Institution. (*Minutes*, 1889, p. 317.)
- 77. System of Marking in Examinations.—The Conference resolves: (1) that in future, in valuing all Examinations and Trial Sermons, a system of marks by numbers from 1 to 7 be adopted, number 1 being the highest value and 7 the lowest.

- (2) That the seven grades shall signify respectively, Excellent, Very Good, Good, Fair, Moderate, Poor, Very Poor. Also, that the marks 1, 2, 3, denote three grades of an Honours Division; and 4, 5, 6, 7, four grades in a Pass Division; "average" quality being indicated by the mark 4 (fair). (Minutes, 1888, p. 214.)
- 78. Candidates for the Ministry from the Welsh Districts.—Candidates for the Ministry from the Welsh Districts who are able to preach in English, and who pass their Examinations in English, shall be regarded as eligible for the general work. (*Minutes*, 1889, p. 317.)
- 79. Circulars to Members of the Synod.—The Chairman shall send a Circular to the Lay Members of his Synod requesting their attendance on the Wednesday, and, if necessary, on the Thursday, in the week of the May Synod; specifying the business that will be brought forward, and particularly mentioning any subject that may have been specially remitted by the Conference to the consideration of such Synod. (Minutes, vol. xviii. [1871], p. 402.)

A similar Circular shall be prepared and sent with reference to the September Synod.

All ministers who are members of the Synod shall also be summoned thereto by circular. (*Minutes*, 1897, p. 243.)

80. Sanitary Condition of Ministers' Houses.—Circuit Stewards are recommended to have an inspection of every Minister's house by an independent sanitary expert, at every change of Minister, and to hand a certificate of the good sanitary condition of the house to the incoming Minister.

The Synods shall enquire, at their September meetings, whether this recommendation of the Conference has been carried out. (*Minutes*, 1893, p. 327; 1894, p. 323.)

81. Suggestions to Conference from the Synods.—A copy of any Suggestion relating to a Connexional Department from a Synod to the Conference, shall be sent immediately after

the Synod, to the Secretary of the Department concerned. (*Minutes*, 1891, p. 323.)

82. Copies of District Minutes.—The Chairmen of Districts are required to procure two complete copies of the Minutes of the several Annual and other Meetings of the Synods, transcribed according to the order of time in which such Synods shall have been held, and duly signed by the Chairman and Secretary.

One of these copies shall be inserted in the District Records; the other shall be sent to the Rev. Albert Clayton, 5, Jackson's Lane, Highgate, London, N., not later than June 15, and delivered by him to the President on the first day of the Conference, to be preserved under his direction, as a document appertaining to the Connexion.

The copies of the latter class shall be written on foolscap paper, that they may be annually bound together in one volume.

The District Secretary is required to furnish the Chairman with such extracts from the District Minutes as he will need at the Conference. (*Minutes*, vol. ii. [1799], p. 24; vol. vii. [1835], p. 554; vol. xx. [1877], p. 514; 1881, pp. 307, 308; 1890, p. 326.)

83. Minor Synod.—In all cases in which the holding of a Minor Synod is rendered necessary, except under the Regulation of 1840, such Synod shall be held in the District in which the accused party resides; the accused and the accuser selecting respectively two Ministers from the said District, and the Chairman of the District other two; the six thus chosen, together with the Chairman of the District, to constitute the Minor Synod.

Should either party refuse or decline to choose two Ministers to act as members of the meeting, the Chairman is empowered and directed to nominate them, so that the number required by rule may be made up. (*Minutes*, vol. ix. [1840], p. 94; vol. xviii. [1870], p. 154; 1894, p. 217.)

In the case of the trial of an appeal against a sentence of expulsion pronounced by the Chairman of a District in the

capacity of Superintendent of a Circuit, the two members of the Minor Synod added by the legislation of 1894 shall be nominated by the President of the Conference. (*Minutes*, 1897, p. 241.)

84. Substitute for the Chairman of a District.—When the Chairman of a District is unable to attend any meeting of his Synod, a Chairman for the occasion shall be elected by the Synod from among the Ministers then present. (*Minutes*, 1891, p. 230.)

85. Trial of the Chairman of a District.—In case of any complaint arising against the Chairman of a District, in reference to either his personal or his official conduct, the accuser, after duly apprising the Chairman of his intention, shall place his complaint in the hands of the President of the Conference for the time being, who shall have authority (it he deem such a course necessary or expedient) to summon a meeting, consisting of the President of the Conference, the Secretary of the Conference (who shall act as Convener of the meeting), and twelve other Ministers who are in Full Connexion with the Conference, of whom six, wherever practicable, shall be chosen from among the Ministers of the District of which the accused is Chairman (each party having the right to challenge any or all of the persons first nominated by the President), and to place the Chairman on his trial before them. If the guilt of the accused be proved, the meeting shall have power to suspend him till the ensuing Conference, or to depose him from the chair; and in that case the members of the Synod concerned shall, as in the case of the death of a Chairman, elect another Chairman.

The above Resolution shall not apply to the legislation of 1835 (*Minutes*, vol. vii. [1835], p. 581) relative to the trial of an appeal against a sentence of expulsion pronounced by the Chairman of a District in the capacity of Superintendent of a Circuit. (*Minutes*, 1894, p. 217.)

IX. Superintendents.

- 86. Weekly Meetings of Ministers.—Ministers appointed to the same Circuit shall meet together once a week, or as often as practicable, in order to converse freely respecting the affairs of their Circuit. (*Minutes*, vol. ii. [1806], p. 348.)
- 87. Reading of Resolutions on Pastoral Work. These Resolutions, as far as the words "counted for a forest," shall be read in the stead of the *Liverpool Minutes* at each May Synod, and at the Ministers' Meeting of each Circuit in September. And the Chairmen of Districts are directed to make enquiry concerning the due observance of this regulation. (*Minutes*, 1885, pp. 356-366.)
- 88. Probationers and the Lord's Supper. Superintendents are required to make the necessary arrangements, in their Circuit Plans, for securing to their junior Colleagues proper facilities for partaking of this holy Sacrament. (*Minutes*, vol. x. [1844], pp. 91, 92.)
- 89. Attendance of Ministers at Official Meetings.—All the Ministers and Probationers appointed to a Circuit have a constitutional right to take part as members in our Leaders' Meetings, and in all other official meetings of the Circuits to which they are appointed. (*Minutes*, vol. xii. [1852], p. 121.)
- 90. Reading of the Pastoral Address.—Superintendents are directed to appoint special Society Meetings, to be held at the principal chapels in their Circuits, for the purpose of having the Pastoral Address read, and made the subject of suitable remarks and exhortations. (*Minutes*, vol. viii. [1838], p. 360.)
- 91. The Covenant Service in Villages.—As many of the members of our Church in village Societies cannot take part in the annual Covenant Service when held only in our principal chapels, the Conference directs Superintendents to arrange, when necessary, for additional Covenant Services for the smaller Societies, to be conducted by Ministers on the week-

nights at the commencement of the new year; and that in connexion with these Services the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper be administered. (*Minutes*, 1893, p. 228.)

- 92. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.—The Conference is impressed with the advisability of arranging for the more frequent administration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper on week-days in those places where it is difficult to arrange for its administration on Sundays. The Conference directs Superintendents of Circuits to pay special attention to this important matter. (Minutes, 1896, p. 230.)
- 93. Quarterly Fast-Days.—The days upon which the Quarterly Fast, appointed by rule, is to be observed throughout the Connexion, for the following year, are Fridays, September 30, December 30, 1898; March 31, and June 30, 1899. (Minutes, vol. i. [1767], p. 73; vol. v. [1821], p. 249.)
- 94. Admission of Members.—Rule of 1797. It is not intended that the names of all those who are on trial should be laid before a Leaders' Meeting for distinct and formal discussion; but solely, that if there be, in the opinion of a Leader, any reasonable objection to the character and conduct of any person who is on trial, such objection may be stated by him; and that, if the validity of the objection be established to the satisfaction of the Meeting, a Member's Ticket shall not be given to such person at the Quarterly Visitation. (Minutes, 1880, p. 265.)
- 95. Recognition of New Members.—The public and formal Recognition of New Members of Society is in accordance with early Methodist usage. A public welcome given by the Society tends to encourage the New Members, whilst the formal recognition will deepen their sense of responsibility.

Such recognition should be associated, wherever practicable, with the Public Service on the Lord's day, morning or evening, and be followed by the administration of the Lord's Supper. In some places it might be found more expedient to recognise New Members at a Society Meeting after the

Quarterly Visitation of the Classes; or, in villages, a Recognition Service might take the place of a week evening service.

The Conference therefore directs that, at least two or three times a year, if practicable, meetings for the Recognition of New Members be held in every Circuit, the frequency and exact nature of such meetings being left to the discretion of the Superintendent. (See "Form of Service," *Minutes*, 1894, pp. 448-454.)

If, upon enquiry, it be found that any person, in other respects eligible for recognition, has not received Christian baptism, that Sacrament shall be administered before the recognition of that person, and, if not otherwise, in connexion with the Recognition Service. (*Minutes*, 1878, p. 186; 1885, p. 278.)

- 96. Quarterly Returns of Membership.—The Conference directs that, where practicable, the numbers for each Society be read in the Leaders' Meeting immediately before each quarter day. (*Minutes*, 1893, p. 228.)
- 97. Annual Return of Members.—The number of Members in the Society, and of persons admitted on trial, as taken at the *March* Quarterly Visitation in each year, and reported at the Synods, shall be the number returned on the Minutes of the following Conference.

These Returns of Members in the Society are to be forwarded, immediately after the May Synods, to the Rev. Henry J. Pope, D.D., Centenary Hall, Bishopsgate Street Within, London, E.C.

98. Trial of Members.—When a charge is brought against any Member resident in a place where no Leaders' Meeting is statedly held, the case shall be referred for investigation to the Leaders' Meeting of the principal Society in the Circuit town. The Leader or Leaders, and the Society Stewards, of the Society of which the accused is a Member, shall be associated with the Leaders' Meeting for the purposes of the investigation.' (Minutes, vol. xv. [1863], p. 541; vol. xviii. [1872], p. 656.)

99. Trial of Trustees.—If the accused person is a *Trustee*, then there shall also be associated with the Leaders' Meeting, as above constituted, the Trustees of the chapel with which the Society of which he is a Member is connected; or, if there is no such chapel, then the Trustees of the chapel in connexion with the principal Society in the Circuit town. But no Trustee shall, in either case, be so associated, unless he is himself a Member of Society in the same Circuit. (*Minutes*, vol. xviii. [1872], p. 656.)

100. Orthodoxy of Office Bearers.—No person shall, on any account, be permitted to retain any official situation in our Societies who holds opinions contrary to the total depravity of human nature, the divinity and atonement of Christ, the influence and witness of the Holy Spirit, and Christian holiness, as believed by the Methodists. (Minutes, vol. ii. [1807], p. 405.)

roi. Junior Society Classes.—In connexion with our Societies, Classes shall be generally established which shall directly provide for the religious instruction of young people. They shall have as their object the early conversion of children to God, their instruction and training in Christian doctrines and morality, and the development of Christian experience and character. For these purposes Holy Scripture shall be largely used. (Minutes, 1894, p. 218.)

roz. Names and Addresses of Circuit Stewards.—The Superintendents of Circuits are required to furnish the Chairman of the District with the names and addresses of the Circuit Stewards immediately after the December Quarterly Meeting; and, immediately after the March Quarterly Meeting, with the name and address of any person elected to attend the May Synod in the place of any Circuit Steward declaring his inability to attend such Synod; and also with the names and addresses of those persons, in addition to the Circuit Stewards, who have been elected as Representatives to the Synod. (Minutes, vol. xviii. [1871], p. 402; 1885, p. 276; 1892, p. 311; 1893, p. 319.)

X. Circuit Quarterly Meeting.

- 103. Election of Representatives to the Synods.—(1) In addition to the Circuit Stewards, who represent especially the financial interests of the Circuit, each Circuit shall, at the March Quarterly Meeting, elect as members of the Synod either one or two Laymen who are considered suitable on general grounds to take part in the counsels of the Synods in the May and September following.
- (2) Circuits employing one or two Ministers shall elect one Representative to the Synod; Circuits with three or more Ministers shall elect two Representatives.
- (3) At these elections the usage of open voting may be departed from, and the elections decided by ballot, after nomination by the Lay Members of the Meeting. (*Minutes*, 1892, p. 311; 1893, p. 319.)
- 140. Church Membership and the Synods.—No one is eligible for a seat in a Synod, or upon any committee thereof, who is not a member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. (Minutes, 1892, p. 309.)
- 105. Circuit Stewards and the Synods.—Circuit Stewards, who are otherwise members of the Synod, shall not be at liberty to decline to attend the Synod as Stewards, and then claim the right to sit and vote by virtue of any other office. (*Minutes*, 1892, p. 311.)
- Quarterly Meeting in March is entitled to elect, provisionally, a substitute for each of the Circuit Stewards, whether he shall, or shall not, have declared his ability and willingness to attend the May Synod; also, a substitute for each of the Representatives, or for the Representative. Any Circuit Steward or Representative who shall find himself unable to attend the Synod shall inform the Superintendent, who shall thereupon invite the substitute to be present. (Minutes, 1897, p. 340.)

107. Candidates for the Ministry.—In any case in which a Candidate has not resided for two years continuously in the Circuit from which he is recommended, the Superintendent of that Circuit shall obtain a written report concerning him from his former Superintendent or Superintendents, so as to cover the previous two years, and present the same to the March Quarterly Meeting and to the Synod. (Minutes, 1895, p. 204.)

108. Division of Circuits.—Before a Synod consents to the division of any Circuit, enquiry must be made whether due attention has been paid to satisfactory arrangements for the Trust Estates affected by the proposed division, especially in reference to debts existing thereon. (*Minutes*, vol. xviii. [1870], p. 154.)

For Regulations as to Division of Circuits, see *Minutes*, 1886, pp. 270-273.

roo. Boundaries of Circuits.—Whereas difficulties have arisen from the want of accurate and recorded definitions of the boundaries of Circuits, the boundaries of Circuits which are divided shall in future be fully stated in the Minutes of the Synod to which they belong, and the Secretary of the Synod shall send a copy of the record to be inserted in the Minutes of the Quarterly Meetings of the Circuits concerned; and in such cases, copies of the ordnance maps, or some other maps, of the localities concerned shall be coloured so as to show the boundaries, and deposited in the safes provided for the custody of the Trust Deeds of the Circuits.

These arrangements shall be made in all cases of alteration in the boundaries of existing Circuits. (*Minutes*, vol. xix. [1874], p. 454.)

110. Juvenile Home and Foreign Missionary Associations.—
(1) The Conference is decidedly of opinion that wherever sums, large or small, are collected avowedly for the Foreign or Home Missions, the whole amount should be remitted to the

Treasurers of those Funds, respectively, to be administered under the direction of their Committees; and that sums so remitted to the Home Mission Fund should entitle a Circuit to favourable consideration if it requests a Grant for any effort within its boundaries which may be a legitimate object for the application of moneys collected for Home Missions.

- (2) In the case of Circuits which are not in a position to ask for the appointment of a Home Missionary Minister, and to give the pledge required, but which feel the necessity of adopting some plan of *Home Missionary* operations, the subjoined allocation is allowed: One-third of the sums received to be paid to the Funds of the Foreign Missionary Society, it being expressly understood that in every case the contribution to the Foreign Missions shall be at least equal to what has been presented from Christmas Offerings, on the average of several preceding years; one-third to the Home Mission and Contingent Fund; one-third to the Circuit, to be expended in support of local movements of a directly Home Missionary character, under the direction of the Superintendent and of a Committee to be appointed at the December Quarterly Meeting.
- (3) A return of the gross amounts collected in the various Circuits by Juvenile Missionary Associations, with the proportions of such amount allocated to the various objects, shall be made yearly, at the May Synods. (*Minutes*, vol. xv. [1863], p. 528; and vol. xx. [1877], p. 398; also 1885, p. 195.)
- mends that in every chapel in which the Offertory System has been introduced, as well as in all other chapels, the Connexional Collections be made on Sundays set apart for the purpose, be duly announced beforehand, the objects and need of the Fund concerned distinctly stated, and an appeal made; and the whole sum so gathered strictly devoted to the stated purpose.
- (2) The Conference recommends that where the aggregate results of the Weekly Offertory System show an increase of

Circuit income (derived from the same sources) over that of years antecedent to the introduction of the System, the Connexional Funds, whether they have suffered or not, shall equitably share in such increased income; and that this object shall be secured by Offertories specially appropriated for this purpose, or otherwise.

- (3) The Conference expresses its strong objection to the practice of allotting to the Connexional Funds any average sum; i.e. a proportion of the yearly receipts from the Offertory, calculated upon the average Collections for a given Fund during a number of years preceding the introduction of the Offertory—in lieu of making Collections for each Fund according to rule. Such a practice is unfair to the several Funds, which are thus precluded from sharing in the general life and progress of the Circuit, and is further liable to the fatal objection that it shuts out all opportunity of bringing the various Funds and their claims before our congregations.
- (4) The Conference is of opinion that the Offertory System should not be adopted in any chapel without the consent of the Circuit Quarterly Meeting. (*Minutes*, 1889, pp. 286, 287.)
- 112. Auxiliary Fund.—Whilst anxious to secure separate and accurate returns of the amounts raised in the Classes, the Conference urges upon the Circuits the necessity of the average of Sixpence per Member being made up in each Circuit; and sanctions this being done in such a way as may be approved in the respective Circuits—provided that the Public Collections, usually made in July, be separately returned. (Minutes, 1890, pp. 265, 266.)
- 113. Grants towards Removal Expenses.—If any Minister be appointed to a Circuit, after an invitation sent by that Circuit to the Minister, every expense incurred by his removal, beyond what the Circuit he is leaving may provide, shall be borne by his new Circuit. (Minutes, 1878, pp. 221, 222.)
- 114. Financial Statement at June Quarterly Meeting.—The Circuit Quarterly Meeting affords a most valuable opportunity for

bringing the Connexional principle before the leading officials of our Circuit; and the Conference recommends that at each June Quarterly Meeting this should be done, and a report made of the Circuit contributions to each Connexional Fund during the year. (*Minutes*, 1889, p. 288.)

For list of Connexional Funds, see pp. 417-420.

- 115. Statistics of Day and Sunday Schools.—The statistics of the Day and Sunday Schools of each Circuit shall be read in the March Quarterly Meeting; but if sufficient time be not then available for the discussion of the statistics, and for enquiry into the state of the Schools, such discussion and enquiry shall take place in the June Quarterly Meeting.
- June Quarterly Meeting, in any Circuit, be of opinion that it is desirable to address to the Conference a Memorial on any Connexional subject, and agree to do so, that Meeting itself, subject to the regulations which follow, shall have authority to adopt and transmit to the Conference such a Memorial. And at such Meeting any Member thereof may propose, for consideration, the propriety of addressing a Memorial to the Conference. (*Minutes*, vol. xii. [1852], p. 111.)
- (2) Any Member of the Quarterly Meeting intending to propose a Resolution, and bring the same before the June Quarterly Meeting as the basis of a Memorial to the Conference, shall give notice, with a copy in writing, of the particular Motion or Resolution which he intends to propose either at the March Quarterly Meeting, or to the Superintendent Minister not less than seven days preceding the date of the June Quarterly Meeting; and no proposal of which such notice has not been given shall be brought forward that year. But should the Quarterly Meeting adopt the substance or principle of a Resolution so brought forward, it may amend, as well as simply adopt or reject it. (Minutes, vol. xii. [1852], p. 112; 1895, p. 367.)

- (3) A Memorial, founded on such Motion or Resolution, if approved by a majority of the persons present, shall be signed by the Chairman of the Meeting; and he shall add a footnote, stating the number of persons present, and also the number voting for and against the Memorial. (*Minutes*, 1891, pp. 331, 362.)
- (4) The Conference directs that Memorials from Circuit Quarterly Meetings be forwarded by the Superintendents of Circuits to the Convener of the Committee on Memorials and Suggestions, the Rev. Enoch Salt, 128, Hamstead Road, Handsworth, Birmingham, not later than ten days before the opening of the Conference. (Minutes, 1889, p. 285.)

The Conference will, as heretofore, receive Memorials up to and including the second day of its session. (*Minutes*, vol. xii. [1852], p. 112.)

- (5) All Memorials thus received by the Conference shall be referred to a Committee of its members, who shall carefully classify and consider the whole, and present their report thereon to the Conference. (*Minutes*, vol. xii. [1852], p. 112.)
- (6) The Quarterly Meeting has complete freedom to memorialise the Conference. It is not competent for the Chairman of a June Quarterly Meeting to rule any Memorial out of order. The Conference reserves to itself alone the right to determine whether a Memorial contains a proposal of a revolutionary character, or subversive of the doctrine or discipline of Wesleyan Methodism. (Minutes, vol. xii. [1852], p. 112; 1895, p. 368.)
- (7) The Conference cannot sanction such Memorials as involve a direct interference on the part of one Circuit with the local affairs or proceedings of any other Circuit. (*Minutes*, vol. xii. [1852], p. 112.)
- (8) No Memorial can be received from the Quarterly Meeting of a Circuit except in manuscript. (*Minutes*, vol. xix. [1874], p. 454.)
- (9) The consideration and determination of all questions ised by Memorials from Circuit Quarterly Meetings shall

come within the province of the Conference when exclusively Ministerial, or when the Lay Representatives shall be present, according to the subject-matter thereof, respectively. In all cases in which there may be any doubt as to the province to which a matter belongs, the President shall decide. (*Minutes*, vol. xx. [1877], p. 424.)

XI. Sunday and Day-Schools.

- 117. Sunday-school Official Meetings.—The Superintendent Minister of the Circuit shall preside at the Annual Meeting of the Committee and Subscribers; and also at all meetings of the Committee, and at all meetings of the Teachers. If at any one of the said meetings the Superintendent Minister be not present, one of the other Ministers of the Circuit shall preside. If no Minister is present, the meeting shall appoint one of the Officers of the institution to act as Chairman; except in the case of a Teachers' Meeting, when one of the Superintendents of the School shall preside. (Minutes, vol. xvii. [1868], p. 384.)
- Meetings.—(1) No one who is not a member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of at least three years' continuous standing shall be ex officio, or eligible to be elected as, a Representative from a Sunday School to the Circuit Quarterly Meeting. No person shall be deemed eligible to represent a Sunday School at the Quarterly Meeting of any Circuit in which he is not at the time a Member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church.
- (2) The senior Superintendent of every Sunday School shall be a member ex officio of the Quarterly Meeting.
- N.B.—Where there are more Superintendents than one, should any difficulty arise as to which Superintendent should be counted the senior, the point may be determined at the meeting when the election of Representatives takes place. The word "senior" is intended to refer to seniority as Superintendent of the school, not to seniority in age.

- (3) In schools with an average attendance of one hundred to three hundred scholars, in addition to the ex-officio Representative, a special Representative shall be chosen from the teachers and officers of the school at the annual Teachers' Meeting.
- (4) In schools with an average attendance of three hundred scholars and upwards, a second special Representative shall be elected in like manner. The special Representative or Representatives shall be elected annually, the same persons being eligible for re-election. Only members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church shall vote for Representatives.
- (5) Where there are two sessions, the average attendance shall be that for the larger session, as given in the official returns for the year preceding that in which the election is made.
- (6) Should any school Superintendent not be a member of the Church, the teachers and officers of the school may, at the annual Teachers' Meeting, elect from among their own number as a Representative some other person who is duly qualified in respect of his membership.
- (7) The time and place of the meeting when Representatives are elected shall be fixed in consultation with the Superintendent Minister, either he or one of his colleagues being in the chair; and in the event of a Circuit Minister not being present, the chairman shall be elected by the meeting, such chairman being a member of the Church. (Minutes, 1894, pp. 313, 314.)
- 119. Our Catechisms in our Sunday Schools.—The Conference attaches the utmost importance to doctrinal teaching in Sunday Schools by means of catechetical instruction, and directs that Ministers shall give special attention to this subject. Superintendents and Teachers are also urgently and affectionately recommended to do their utmost to promote the use of our Catechisms. (Minutes, vol. xix. [1873], p. 176; 1882, pp. 224, 225; 1890, p. 279; 1896, p. 230.)

120. Correct Returns from Sunday Schools.—With a view to securing more correct returns from Sunday Schools, it is an instruction to the Secretary or Secretaries of each School that, wherever practicable, the Schedule of Returns be submitted to the Local Committee before such Returns are presented to the Circuit Quarterly Meeting. (Minutes, 1885, p. 278.)

121. Examination of Pupil-Teachers.—The Annual Examination of Pupil-Teachers in Religious Knowledge shall be held on the last Saturday in October and on the first Saturday in March. The questions shall be prepared by the General Committee; the Examination held, either in the several Circuits by the Superintendent Ministers or their Colleagues, or at suitable places for Central District Examinations, as may be determined by the September Synods, and agreed to by the respective School Committees; and the written answers forwarded to the General Secretary, to be valued by a Central Board of Examiners elected by the General Committee. (Minutes, vol. xv. [1863], pp. 534, 535; vol. xx. [1877], p. 409.)

The Conference recommends that, in connexion with Central Examinations, meetings of Teachers and Pupil-Teachers be held under the direction of the Chairman of the District and the District Education Secretary.

XII. Miscellaneous.

- 122. Custody of Trust Deeds.—The Conference recommends that a Fire Proof Safe be provided in each Circuit, and that all Deeds relating to Trust Property be carefully preserved therein.
- 123. Register of Trust Deeds.—A Register of all Deeds and Documents relating to Trust Properties in the Circuit shall be preserved in a book; and the Deeds and Documents shall be compared with this Register annually by the Superintendent Minister and the Circuit Chapel Secretary, or by some other person to be appointed for the purpose by the Annual United Trustees' Meeting.

124. Names and Addresses of Trustees.—The Names, Addresses, and Occupations of the Trustees of all our Trust Properties, as entered in the Circuit Book, are to be revised annually by the Superintendent Minister. (Minutes, 1891, p. 259.)

125. Political Meetings in Wesleyan Methodist Trust Premises.—Having regard to the fact that in some places a desire has been expressed to use our Trust Property for the purpose of Political Meetings, the Conference declares that such uses are not contemplated by the provisions of any of our Trust Deeds; and it reminds Superintendents and Trustees that our Trust Properties can only be lawfully used for the purposes provided for in the Trust Deeds.

The Conference expresses the conviction that any such use of the premises as that suggested would be detrimental to the best interests of our Societies by endangering their peace and unity. (*Minutes*, vol. vii. [1834], p. 420; 1885, p. 185; see also Resolutions on Parish Councils, *Minutes*, 1894, p. 323.)

126. The Ballot in Quarterly Meetings, etc.—At the elections in Quarterly Meetings of the Representatives to the District Synods the usage of open voting may be departed from, and the elections decided by ballot, after nomination by the Lay Members of the Meeting.

In respect of all other elections made at Quarterly Meetings the Conference re-affirms its regulation of 1884. (Minutes, 1893, p. 319.) "The practice of voting by ballot in the administration of Methodism in our Circuits is contrary to long-established usage, and its adoption would in various ways be injurious to the interests of our Societies." (Minutes, 1884, p. 191.)

127. Monthly Meetings of Ministers in Large Towns.—The Preachers of different Circuits, when resident in the same town, shall meet at least once in every month for the purposes of mutual conference and prayer, in order to promote brotherly

love, and to afford frequent and regular opportunities for friendly consultation on subjects of common concern in their respective Circuits. (*Minutes*, vol. vi. [1827], p. 281.)

128. London Mission.—The number of Members at each Place in the Mission, with the amounts received as Ordinary Income, shall be printed, year by year, in the Agenda of the Conference. (Minutes, 1890, p. 262.)

129. Lord's Day Observance.—The Temperance Committee of each District shall take direct oversight of the Lord's Day Question. (*Minutes*, 1896, p. 331.)

The Annual Address

OF

THE CONFERENCE

TO THE

METHODIST SOCIETIES.

DEAR BRETHREN,-

We gather in our Annual Conference with fervent thanksgiving to God for His goodness to us as a Church, and full of hope in our all-sufficient Lord, who will make our future far better and brighter than the past. It is fitting that we should rejoice in the peace and freedom which are our birthright, if at the same time we watch against self-complacency, and remember that our privileges, like the salvation of which they are a part, are the gift of a divine hand. Whilst every age seeks to express truth in its own forms of speech, and may sometimes succeed in improving on the phraseology of the past, there is no sign of any change in our attitude towards the foundation doctrines of the faith. Under our outward forms of worship are smouldering no sinister revolutions, against which the worshippers themselves are helpless to protest, and into our sacramental celebrations are introduced no gestures which insinuate a gospel at variance with that you have already received. We are not haunted by misgivings lest the truth which has sanctified multitudes should not be taught to our children and to our children's children. The doctrinal

continuity of the religious movement of which we are children and heirs is absolutely unbroken, although we need to pray, as will every fresh generation, for the passionate conviction of our forefathers. That cannot be acquired by heredity or tradition, and must be sought anew through every day of our Perhaps there never was a period when passing events tended to define and accentuate our providential place in the kingdom of God amongst men as they do now. vocation has not lapsed. We are but on the threshold of a great and honourable history. Let us be patient and abound in hope by the power of the Holy Ghost. Our Church organisation. which is a growth, and not a feat of one man's ecclesiastical statesmanship, may sometimes seem complex, elaborate, burdensome. Do not despise it, for its advantages are incalculable, and the course of events will more and more tend to show it as a providential development. We have the liberty and the independence of a free Church, and at the same time, in the hosts of noble workers who have been raised up and linked in closest brotherhood with the pastorate we have resources for national evangelism equal to those of a Church backed by the wealth and prestige of the State. Do your best to share as fully as possible the burdens of our special organisation, so that those who are set apart to the word of God and prayer may maintain freshness and power in their teaching, and may be free to give themselves to the strictly spiritual tasks of their vocation.

We rejoice in a net increase of between three and four thousand members, but that does not satisfy our aspirations. The migratory character of the populations in some of our chief towns and cities is adverse to the stable and gracious neighbourly feeling which distinguished the social life of the past, and at the same time imperils the growth and well-being of many of our Churches. Sometimes members who remove to distant places, whilst not finally lost to us, make the actual transfer of their membership a question of months and years. They do not feel at home in their new surroundings. and perhaps unjustly imagine the nearest Methodist con-. gregation to be cold and inhospitable to strangers. in the choice of a class, they allow golden opportunities of service and of spiritual enrichment to pass, whilst they weigh the competing virtues of a number of capable class-leaders. To those whose occupations or interest may compel them to

move into new neighbourhoods, we say affectionately, that such slowness to enter anew into the life and fellowship of the Church is a wrong alike to yourselves and to the work of God.

We are assured that tens of thousands of our young people are in right paths, and will grow up into loyal and steadfast disciples; but conversion is not always so clear and sharply defined as we could wish. Perhaps one reason of this is that the religious instruction they have received is not full and specific. In both the school and the home pleasant religious generalities often form the staple of Christian nurture. It is to be feared, too, that the tendency manifest amongst some well-educated Methodists to treat religious experience as a subject of sacred reserve closes to the young learners in Christ's school a volume of incomparable value. out of which many of us a generation ago gathered our most impressive lessons of the Christian life. We do not expect to see in our young people the swift, dramatic transitions characteristic of the early revivals; but conversion ought always to be clear, and the less striking it may be in its attendant incidents, the more need that it should change the current of the life and prove itself by holy tempers and an upright conversation.

Whilst the doctrinal controversies of the present generation have not found for themselves special centres of activity and disturbance within our own borders, yet, in common with other Churches, we suffer from an unhealthy softening of the fibres of faith: and this constitutes one of the weaknesses of our evangelical work. Men do not believe so heartily and emphatically as once they did, and there is a tendency to settle down in an attitude of suspense and reserve. Perhaps the excitement and distraction of the present day,—life oscillating as it often does between the excess of business occupation and the abandon of amusement.—leave the mind less fit for conviction, besides narrowing the opportunity for sustained thought. It is the intellectual fashion to keep an open mind, and to be judicial in temper; but this judicial pose may easily pass into an infirmity and a spiritual disease. Some questions that lie on the borderland between science and religion, criticism and faith, are not ripe for final settlement, and we must learn to be patient without panic. We may weary and dishearten ourselves by constructing theories adjusted to imperfectly ascertained facts, and therefore needing to be changed again. On the other hand, we may be sure that the truths which are vital to salvation and which have been the motive forces of the revival that cradled our spiritual life, admit of clear definition and unalterable statement; or the gospel itself is void. The all-wise God cannot have left us at the mercy of technical criticism and research in the things that touch our innermost experience of His redeeming grace, and any scheme of doctrine woven by the skill of experts, and too fine for the common reason and conscience to appreciate, cannot be of the essence of salvation.

One of the chief difficulties of the hour is to harmonize the new temper of tolerance demanded from us by an ever-growing public opinion with the old-fashioned zeal for the salvation of men and for the promulgation of those special truths which effectually further that salvation. Nothing is lost by frankly recognising the right of each individual to think for himself in matters of faith, at least if he is prepared to think seriously. Those who have nominally a voice in determining the lines of political action to be pursued by the statesmen who govern us, and in shaping the many-sided programmes of the municipalities to which they belong, will not consent to a religious dictation which disfranchises the noblest faculties of the mind. Men insist upon the right of thinking for themselves, even when they have not as yet been educated to a wise and deep-searching use of that right. This fact must be patiently reckoned with, although its outcome in some cases is extravagant vapouring and wanton egotism. But tolerance of temper is sometimes a veil for supineness, and this intellectual virtue may pass almost unconsciously into a moral and religious vice. We are tempted to say that because our neighbour has the right of judgment in matters of religion, and is accountable for its careful exercise, he must bear his own burden; and so we make comparatively light our responsibility for those in whose midst God has placed us. Is it not because of this that we feel a less profound concern for the salvation of our neighbours than was felt by our devoted forefathers? That in the present day every man is his own watchman, and that to blow the blast of warning for another will be accounted the impertinence of an overweening piety, is an easy inference to draw, and an inference which abets our lethargy. Our tolerance sometimes

passes into an indulgent attitude towards sin, as though the distinction between right and wrong might be matter of opinion; and in the midst of our endless babble about brotherhood we forget that the rebuke of sin is one of its first principles. Our vaunted humanity itself is unreal unless it prompts us to rescue men from the worst of evils. "Thou shalt not hate thy brother in thine heart: thou shalt surely rebuke thy neighbour, and not bear sin because of him." Whilst bigotry is one of those forms of wrath that can never work the righteousness of God, habitual silence in the presence of sin is an affront to the holiness of Him who besets us behind and before, and will one day be seen as a profound treachery to the wrongdoer himself.

An age of liberty ought to be a new dispensation of the Holy Spirit, for God can work without restraint where men are free. Be not forgetful of the fact that every mind is the sphere of the Spirit's illuminating work and persuasive leading, and it is only by the methods of moral appeal that we can successfully co-operate with His work in human souls. He whom the Spirit is always drawing will not need to be driven by harsh speech or intolerant act. To employ force in any of its forms to bring men to godliness is not only to infringe upon the rights of the reason and the conscience, but also to show distrust of the methods of the Spirit and the sufficiency of His sacred ministries. It is only in an age of perfect freedom that the ideas which are spiritually fit can best survive and triumph. Old forms of authority may decay, but the Comforter in whom we ever trust abides to create and multiply new centres of authority in the minds that are docile to His leading, and saving, essential truths will never lack inward and unmistakable sanction.

When face to face with that temper of restless independence which asserts itself in every realm of human life, let us have wisdom and unshrinking courage. That temper often appears in the home, and forms an apparent barrier to the religious training and nurture of children. Our sons and daughters claim an earlier and a larger liberty than was conceded to their parents. But if those who are the heads of households enlarge their knowledge without ceasing, and keep well ahead of the rising generation, and, above all, if they cultivate the spirit of comradeship with their children, the

old authority will come back in better and more gracious Those children remain truest to the God and to the Church of their fathers who have been treated as companions and shown the reason of things from the beginning. genial atmosphere of the home, when not vitiated by laxity, will nourish better fruit than the iron sternness of its piety. This independent temper makes the special difficulty of the faithful men and women who conduct our meetings for testimony and mutual edification. Direct questions as to the spiritual state of those over whom they watch are resented. unless there is the meekness which comes from profound contrition. The power of those who once acted as authoritative spiritual directors is in abeyance. But it is still possible in our social means of grace to encourage conversation which will give a sure clew to the spiritual state and supply a true basis for appropriate admonition and counsel. And in the class-room as in the family circle we may win confidence and prove ourselves helpers of the common faith and love where it is no longer possible to dictate.

The apostolic Churches were cradled within the home; and the congregations of worshippers in which the spirit of love, brotherly kindness, mutual care, and goodwill associated with the name of home is wanting have lost one of the chief notes of the primitive fellowship. Let those who have wealth, social standing, the distinction of culture, go out of their way to welcome those in less favoured positions, who often are keenly sensitive to their disabilities. Let ministers and people unite to keep the spirit of caste out of our congregations, and to drive it away where it is already creeping in. We must never despise our own godly and long-tested poor, who often have a deep and instructive experience of spiritual things, and at whose feet we may sit with profit. See that the tragic contrast between Dives and Lazarus never exists in the household of Jesus Christ, for the shameful contrast will in some degree injure the collective Church as surely as it destroys the individual soul.

Let us beware of exclusiveness in our religious life and fellowship. Sometimes Christian men and women of culture so far misinterpret their obligations to those who are members of the same mystical body, that they insist upon treating religious experience as one of the inviolable secrets of the individual soul. Such an attitude towards those who share

a common life will have as its logical issue the rise of a clique of select, insular, supercilious pietists within Christ's fold. By sealing up our experiences from the knowledge of others it is possible for us to repeat the sin of the scribes, and take away from others the key of the kingdom. Those about us have a claim to the guidance which will come from the free and trustful opening up of our deepest experiences of the things of God. It is true we must bear witness by the blameless life, but if we never move our lips to confess what the Lord hath done for us, those about us will ascribe our excellences to nature rather than to grace. A shallow and voluble piety is repulsive, but on the other hand mute discipleship is an infirmity which the Lord who redeemed us does not expect to be the rule in His household. The Spirit brings to us the enrichment of utterance, and we must use His gift. St. Paul expected not only to comfort the Roman believers by his faith, but to be comforted in turn by the faith of many who were on a lower level of knowledge and opportunity than himself.

We mourn because the mass of irreligion and indifference at our doors shows little sign of disintegration and abatement, although aggressive unbelief is for the moment discredited. Possibly the crowds who are outside our sanctuaries are no worse than the formalists who are within. think it honest not to enter churches when they have little or no spiritual life and conviction, and they are less careful than once to conciliate those sections of the community in which the Christian profession is maintained. Our town and city missions will not solve the problem while the mass of indifference grows by reason of the heart-breaking drift from Christian homes. Be as diligent in training your children to conscientious attendance at God's house as in drilling them into good business habits, and never be absent yourselves from public worship without sufficient cause. Be reverent in God's house, and do not make light of the fitting posture of devotion. We wish so to beautify our worship everywhere, and to improve our service of praise, that it shall be in accord with the best taste of the times. We have suffered disastrously through our past slackness in these things. But when the utmost has been done, the church and its forms of worship, however attractive, will not bind your children unless those children are led into the love of God. Religion must be based upon a principle, and can never be built up out of our tastes and likings. It is possible to found an academy upon art, music, or letters, but not to found the home. Wayward children will forsake the most exquisitely appointed household if the captivation of love be wanting. And God's house will only be yearned for and its courts frequented with year-long fidelity by those who have learned to love God. Do not overlook this antidote to irreligion, this only safeguard to the religious steadfastness and fidelity of your children in days to come. If you fail to exemplify before them the love of God, and to inspire them with its sacred motives, they themselves, in spite of their baptismal dedication to God, will help to make the tragic problem with which the missionaries of the next century must deal.

Learn to live simply in this age of luxury, excess, and fastidious refinement. Do not assume that the acquisition of wealth is the great end of life; and loathe those gains which accrue through the impoverishment and degradation of others. Our newspapers give glimpses of a retributive righteousness when they record the swift overthrow of men who make huge fortunes through falsehood and unscrupulous speculation. Alike in business and recreation abhor all that savours of chance. The heinousness of gambling does not rise or fall with the sums of money involved. Some vices arise from the excess of legitimate and useful appetites, but gambling is a vice root and branch, and infinitesimal degrees of it contravene alike social and spiritual laws. It is the Master's teaching that money is a trust from God for others, and that principle must rule our use of pence as well as of pounds. The anarchic socialisms of our day would have been unthinkable systems if those who bear Christ's name had consistently followed His example in the use of money. Your children will be happier in themselves, and better fitted for the vicissitudes of the future, if schooled in self-denial and simplicity of life.

The Conference has been gladdened at hearing of revived missionary enthusiasm within our Churches. We look to you to maintain and increase the liberality of the past year. Difficulties of administration and back-sets to our providential development will occur if this liberality is spasmodic. On some of our foreign fields the preparatory work is so slow that intermittent effort must necessarily prove vain and wasted. Great movements are near at hand in the Far East. In high

places of authority are to be found those who feel dissatisfied with the systems of the past, and who are patiently and reverently studying the Christian literature that has been placed within their reach. The permanence of movements that may soon be officially initiated in Eastern empires will depend upon the extent to which the popular mind has been saturated with Christian teaching through unremunerative periods of toil. There must be timely enterprise and unflagging loyalty. Our high opportunities, if unimproved, may pass, never to return. The territorial aggressions of European powers in some cases threaten evangelical faith, and the new international doctrine of "spheres of influence" may lead on to the base and sordid proselytisms of diplomacy.

We rejoice in the growing sense of kinship that marks our relations with the United States. The efforts of our brethren to disburden suffering peoples of the pitiless and truculent misgovernments under which they have groaned command our warmest sympathy, and our sympathy is valued as never before. In fusing together the two great divisions of the Anglo-Saxon race, the Churches have played the chief part, although, like their Lord, they do not cry nor uplift their voice in the highways of international politics. Common Church ideals, the inbred passion for civil and religious liberty, the fellowship of an evangelical faith that is one and undivided in all essentials, are perhaps stronger uniting and annealing forces than blood and kinship. fostering the spirit of brotherly kindness between ourselves and the great Western world you will serve the interests of the faith in every land.

The present Conference has approved the scheme for gathering a fund to celebrate the beginning of a new century in our national history, and at the same time strengthen in enduring ways almost every department of our Church life. In this great effort it is hoped that rich and poor will be associated in a common act of munificent love and liberality, and that the names of those taking part in the effort will be inscribed, without distinction of amounts contributed, upon a roll. Such an enterprise needs much prayer, diligence, and careful preparation; but we are sure that you will respond to this appeal, and that in the new period upon which we are so soon to enter our work will be placed upon a yet broader and stronger basis.

430 ADDRESS TO THE METHODIST SOCIETIES. [1898.

The President of the Conference, whose gifts as a missioner and an evangelist are known throughout the Churches, proposes during his year of office to hold conventions for all classes of Christian workers in the chief centres of our Methodist toil. Let this effort have a constant place in your sympathy and prayer. Expect a revival of Church life that shall outshine the memorable revivals of the past and fit us for the larger victories which are at hand.

"Let the heaven and earth praise Him, the seas, and everything that moveth therein. For God will save Zion, and will build the cities of Judah: that they may dwell there, and have it in possession. The seed also of His servants shall inherit it: and they that love His name shall dwell therein."

TO THE

BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1898.

HONOURED FATHERS AND BELOVED BRETHREN IN CHRIST,-

We send you greeting in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, both yours and ours, praying always for your welfare

and rejoicing in your prosperity.

The presence of our President, Rev. William L. Watkinson, has given us peculiar joy, and the admiration with which we have watched from afar his illustrious services has been kindled into love by the happy acquaintance and friendship which will be from henceforth our cherished possession. The wisdom of his counsel, the suavity and firmness of his control, the charm of his personality, and his brilliant genius, in the pulpit and on the platform, have demanded and received our highest and most affectionate esteem. The companions of the President, the Rev. Dr. Marshall Randles, whom we knew and love, and the Rev. T. Galland Hartley and the Rev. James Lewis (A), neither of whom had visited our Conference previously, we shall henceforth consider brothers indeed, and choice friends. We very greatly regret the absence, and especially the cause of the absence, of Sir George Smith, your Lay Representative, whom we had hoped to welcome amongst us, and whom we trust to see on some future occasion.

We have been favoured with the presence of Delegates from the Methodist Episcopal Church of America, Bishop Fowler and the Rev. Dr. Hamilton, whose messages of love, and fraternal presence, have been very precious to us. We have further enjoyed visits from Bishop Thoburn of the Methodist Episcopal Mission in India, and the Rev. G. Armstrong Bennetts, B.A., your own Temperance Secretary, whose utterances have helped

to make this a notable Conference in our history.

We give God increasing thanks for the grace which is bestowed upon you and the blessing with which your labours have been crowned. We rejoice at the phenomenal success of your great missions to the masses of the population in so many of the large towns and cities of your land. These are an inspiration to us, though our circumstances are such that we can imitate them only in a very few centres.

Of the glorious victories attending our Central Missions in Dublin and Londonderry, and especially in Belfast, the brethren whom we send to you will not fail to give you an account; but our latest, and perhaps greatest "forward movement" has been conducted along entirely different lines. At our last Conference we instituted the Central Ireland Mission, and set apart one of our brethren to organise and superintend an effort to preach the gospel to our countrymen in the fairs and markets of the South and West Midlands of Ireland. This work has been crowned with much blessing. Our brethren have gone in companies of four or five, and have delivered the gospel message by song and sermon to the multitudes gathered in these centres of commerce. Sometimes greeted with hard or unsavoury missiles, with unloving and unlovely epithets, they have nevertheless persevered, and in every town thus visited the valour of the disturbers has been eventually quelled by the people themselves, in the general desire to hear the gospel; and audiences of hundreds, and sometimes of thousands, have listened "for the space of three hours" to the earnest and loving appeals of these faithful We know not whereunto this thing will grow, but we are determined by God's grace to use this promising opportunity of bringing home the good news of a free salvation through faith in Christ, as the future may supply occasion.

We offer our most grateful thanks to those English friends who have generously sought to alleviate the sufferings of the distressed portion of our population. Agrarian destitution has been, of recent years, largely mitigated by legislation and by education; yet, in the absence of manufactures and of capital, there is always a considerable amount of distress in the least fertile parts of the country, even when, as during the past year, no extraordinary cause of poverty has occurred. For the relief afforded, and better still, for means to prevent the perpetuation of such conditions of penury, our deepest

gratitude is offered. We also desire warmly to thank you for the widespread assistance given by English Methodism to secure the passing of "The Intoxicating Liquors (Ireland) Bill" which would insure to us in city and in country the permanent blessing of a sober Sunday, and, by closing publichouses at an early hour on Saturday evening, would remove a chief cause of crime. We are disappointed, though not dismayed, at the recent refusal of the Government to grant facilities for the passing of the Bill, and as this is by no means a party question, we have no hesitation in beseeching you to continue to give your powerful assistance to induce the Government to grant us this modest instalment of righteous legislation. We shall rejoice, when the opportunity arrives, to help in securing for England also the great boon of a Sunday free from drunken debauchery and all its attendant evils, which has been so great a blessing to the greater part of Ireland and to Scotland in recent years.

We lament with you the removal from the scene of his earthly ministry of such an ornament to the Church as Dr. Moulton, whose piety and labours were a glory to the Church which he adorned, and a never-failing occasion of thanksgiving to the great Head and Lord of all, who has bestowed such gifts upon His servants. We also have mingled joy and sorrow in the contemplation of one of our own beloved and honoured brethren, taken to a higher ministry, promoted to be with Christ, "which is far better" for him, and for us a loud call to faithfulness in life and service. Dr. William Crook was truly a man of note amongst us, who had occupied a place in this ministry for the last half-century. Scholar, antiquarian, historian, he was above all things a Methodist preacher. was well known to you and highly valued his association with you in the Legal Conference. To fill the vacant place we nominate our dear brother, the Rev. Charles H. Crookshank, M.A., who in various capacities has well and faithfully served God and His Church. One of our younger ministers, the Rev. James Harpur, after a peculiarly zealous and fruitful service of twenty-two years, has gone to his great reward; and during the sessions of the Conference we mourned the death of one of our beloved fathers, the Rev. Andrew Armstrong, who had served the Church faithfully for forty-three years.

To continue the goodly succession God has this year gives us seventeen approved young men as Candidates for our works

upon whom we pray that the mantles of the ascending prophets may fall,

We are able to report a continued increase in our membership, despite the constant emigration by which so much of our

labour goes to bless other lands.

Our Primary Schools, in which combined secular and separate religious instruction is free to all, grow in importance and efficiency. Our Collegiate Institutions in Dublin and Belfast continue to take first rank in the country in Intermediate Education. We have in Ireland no professedly denominational universities, and we pray God that we may be long spared so great an evil. Our work amongst the young grows in interest and effectiveness. Our Sunday scholars almost equal in number our Church members. Our Temperance work commands the hearty sympathy of practically all our people. Our Christian Endeavour societies are infusing new vigour into many of our Churches.

We send as our Representatives to your Conference in Hull four of our most highly esteemed brethren: the Rev. Dr. R. Crawford Johnson, who is nominated as the Irish member of the Delegation, the Rev. Richard Cole, editor of *The Christian Advocate*, the Rev. Hugh M'Keag, and Mr. T. Foulkes Shillington, Treasurer of our Chapel Fund and of the Belfast Central

Mission.

We pray that God may "make all grace abound toward you; that ye, always having all sufficiency in all things, may abound to every good work."

ADDRESS OF THE IRISH CONFERENCE OF 1898.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,-

Once more we have received your Annual Address with unalloyed satisfaction, and rejoice in the renewed opportunity it affords us of greeting you in Christ. We reciprocate to the full your cordial expressions of affection. We glory in your triumphs in the gospel, and sympathise with you in your trials; but, above all, "we give thanks to God alway for you," brethren, for that your faith groweth exceedingly.

We have given a hearty welcome to the four honoured brethren whom you have sent to us as your Representatives. Some of them were already well known to us. The name of Dr. Crawford Johnson is familiar to a wide circle on this side the water, who have watched with deepening interest the growth of your Belfast Mission. He is, in a sense, one of us, as a member of our Legal Conference, and we rejoice in the further honour you have done him in electing him your Vice-President. Other members of your deputation are hardly less widely known among us. We receive them all in love and honour, both for their work's sake and for the commission they bear. We have listened with deep interest to the eloquent and inspiring accounts they have given of the work of God among you.

We render devout and humble thanks to the great Head of the Church for the peace and prosperity that you enjoy, and for the manifest blessing that crowns your ministry. We especially rejoice to hear that on almost every hand religious liberty is increasing around you, and, most of all, that the common people are receiving, and learning to value aright, the priceless boon of an open Bible.

We recognise, as in past years we have once and again

assured you, the peculiar difficulties under which much of your work is carried on. The predominance of Romanism in the greater part of your Island, with the crushing tyranny of priestcraft; the almost chronic distress which prevails in the South and West, and the steady tide of emigration which robs you of much youthful vigour and promise that under happier circumstances you would gladly keep at home;—these are no trifling hindrances, and we are thankful to find that, in spite of them, your Church membership continues to increase. rejoice especially in the blessing that rests upon your ordinary Circuit work, in which, as with us, the great majority of your brethren are engaged. Little cause for satisfaction can either you or we ever have if, along with development on other lines, there be not a proportionate strengthening and consolidation here. We are therefore profoundly thankful to note that in the varied activities that manifest and constitute a vigorous Church life—that edify and build up the body of Christ, making it increasingly powerful both for defence and for attack—the blessing of Almighty God has abundantly rested upon you.

We bless God for the great success which continues to crown your Central Missions in Dublin, Londonderry, and Belfast, and also for the establishment of the Central Ireland Mission, and the success that it has achieved during its first year. Open-air preaching is no new thing in Methodism, and its extension among you is a happy augury for the future. We rejoice to know that by this means the gospel in its simplicity and power is being proclaimed in districts hitherto deemed inaccessible to you, and that, while you have had to encounter opposition, you have already been permitted to see not a little fruit. May the brethren who are called to this important and honourable service be specially equipped for it from on high!

We are heartily at one with you in your determined opposition to the establishment of a Roman Catholic University in your midst—a step which we hold could not be justified on any public ground, and which is wholly unnecessary in the interests of sound education. We also share your regret that the Intoxicating Liquors (Ireland) Bill has not become law, and we shall be ready at all times to do all in our power to further such legislation. The great evils of drink, Sabbath desecration, and an inordinate passion for amusement, confront and oppose both you and us. We desire with you not a sober

Sunday only, but a holy Sunday; for we are firm and unshaken in our conviction that the only way to secure to man the priceless boon of the Day of Rest is to consecrate it unreservedly to God, to make it in deed and in truth the Lord's Day.

We deeply appreciate your sympathetic references to one great loss which has befallen us during the year, in the death of our beloved Dr. Moulton, a loss which the whole Christian Church shares with us. You, too, have mingled joy and sorrow at the grave of your honoured dead. Be assured of our deep sympathy. Your bereavement, indeed, is also ours, for Dr. William Crook was for many years an honoured member of our Legal Conference. We give glory to God who bestows such precious gifts upon His Church. Brother Crook, through an exceptionally long and powerful ministry, bore aloft the banner of evangelical truth. May his mantle fall upon the young brethren whom you have this year admitted to your ranks, that with no unequal step they may follow him as he followed Christ!

You will rejoice with us that we are able to report an increase of 3,279 in our Church membership, and that the offerings of our people for Foreign Missions have been considerably enlarged, a sure indication, as we believe, of quickened spiritual life. The sessions of our Conference have been rich in blessing, and we look forward to the year we now begin with humble yet confident expectation of that full baptism of the Holy Ghost which, most of all, we need. Our President has felt moved to propose that, setting aside the usual and ordinarily necessary routine of Presidential service, he shall devote his year of office to earnest and systematic effort throughout the Connexion for the quickening and deepening of spiritual life. The Conference accepted this proposal with unanimous delight, and the earnest prayers and hearty cooperation of all our people are assured. We ask you to join us in this united effort.

Another notable outcome of our deliberations demands brief mention—the "Twentieth Century Fund" which we have resolved to raise; a million guineas from a million Methodists. Our Church is, we believe, well able to make this additional offering without any diminution of her ordinary gifts, and, if it be undertaken humbly, gratefully, joyfully, as a thankoffering to Almighty God for His boundless mercies, and be carried through in no spirit of boasting or aggrandisement, but as a

reverent and solemn act of worship, we believe that it will not only relieve the material needs of our Church, but will react in rich spiritual blessing upon us all. In this service, too, we are assured by your representatives you will be forward to join us.

Our honoured President in his visit to your Conference in 1899 will be accompanied by our trusted and beloved brethren, the Rev. William L. Watkinson, Ex-President, Dr. Henry J. Pope, and William D. Walters, whose visit will, we doubt not, be, both to you and to them, an occasion of inspiration and refreshment.

And now, dear brethren, with renewed assurances of our love, and unceasing prayers for your welfare, we "commend you to God, and to the word of His grace, which is able to build you up, and to give you an inheritance among all them that are sanctified."

OF THE

FRENCH CONFERENCE OF 1898

TO THE

BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1898.

Beloved and Honoured Fathers and Brethren,-

We have listened with deep interest to your touching Address, and gratefully acknowledge the precious encouragements which it contains. You have understood our difficulties, and you have known how to appreciate our indirect success.

If the labours of your brethren in France have not resulted in the formation of a great Church in our country, they have nevertheless accomplished, in a large measure, the object which John Wesley always set before him in the evangelisation of your land, namely, the spread of scriptural Christianity. The good effected in this respect by French Methodism is incalculable. Although it cannot claim to have founded the first Sunday School in France, yet it is perfectly accurate to affirm that in several great centres, and particularly in the most Protestant parts of France, Sunday Schools are due to the initiative of our Church, and especially to the labours of our talented colleague, the late John Paul Cook, who is recognised by all the French Churches as the pioneer of the Sunday School in France.

Our example has caused a great number of Schools to spring up around us: so that in the present day the activity of the Reformed Church is largely maintained by faithful men and women, who were trained from their youth to Christian work in our schools and in our other services. Our Mission has not contributed much to our numerical development as an individual Church; but, by the grace of God, it has been efficacious in the enlargement of the Church universal and in the extension of the reign of the Redeemer of mankind.

Further, the gospel flag has been set up by our fathers and by ourselves in many districts where, for a long time past, it had been supplanted by that of rationalism, or of a gospel in which the name of Jesus Christ merely figured for form's sake. To-day, in the places referred to, it would be impossible for the official Protestant Church to make the populations accept as pastors men who are not faithful to the teachings of the New Testament and to the doctrines of the Reformation. Methodism has created the taste for Evangelical preaching.

We may also mention, while ascribing all the glory to God, that, notwithstanding our shortcomings, our labours continue to receive the seal of the Master's approval. We have a small increase of members; but our official returns show that, during the year, one hundred and fifty-two persons have been received into the Church; and the one hundred and thirty-six who remain on trial give us the hope that the coming year will yield a larger increase.

Two young brethren have been cordially received into Full Connexion. One is the son of a devoted Minister, and the other has been from his childhood trained among us for a life of piety and usefulness. Two of our Students enter upon Circuit work, and ten Candidates are beginning or pursuing theological studies. For many years we have not had so large a number of Candidates, and they are, almost without

exception, our own spiritual children.

Our hearts are gladdened by other favourable signs. The work of conversion goes on among our hearers. In some places a considerable number of young people gather around our Ministers, and are drawn to receive the gospel. In some of our stations, particularly in the Cévennes, there is an increase of members and of Sunday scholars. There is progress also in our receipts for the support of the Ministry. Evangelistic work among Roman Catholics is carried on with success at Havre, at Levallois, and at Cherbourg. We also give our earnest co-operation to the Temperance Societies, and to the associations having for their object public morality, the sanctification of the Lord's Day, Sunday-school work, the publication of religious tracts, etc.

We cannot but consider these pleasing signs as the forerunners of a widespread revival, which we ardently pray the Giver of every good gift speedily to send us. Our confidence in a brighter future is strengthened by the success of your Home Mission work. You have put new life into Churches which had long been declining, by the adoption of new and energetic methods of work. We trust that, by following your example, the life of former times will reappear in places where a dangerous lukewarmness has taken the place of an ardent "first love."

We beg you to accept the expression of our lively gratitude for the new proofs of sympathy which you have shown us. We feel ourselves to be especially encouraged by the pleasant relations which we have, several times each year, with your worthy representatives, the Rev. Frederic W. Macdonald and the Rev. Marshall Hartley, whose fraternal words and fervent prayers never fail to inspire us with fresh courage.

Our Conference has been held this year, for the first time, in our new chapel at Levallois, an important and growing town in the suburbs of Paris, where we are doing a work comparatively new, but rich in promise of extension and stability. In this church took place a solemn ordination service, in presence of a numerous congregation of serious and sympathetic hearers. We are convinced that the religious services held during the Synod (now the official name of the French Conference) will yield blessed fruit for the local Church. A larger place has been given to prayer, relying upon the faithful promises of Him who willeth to revive us again, that we may rejoice and be glad in Him.

Exposed for a while to unaccustomed reproach, objects of a violent hostility which has its source in unfounded prejudices, we still hope in God, and, waiting for His salvation, study to be approved of Him who searcheth our hearts. We do not lose courage, being convinced that victory will be given to that gospel which it is our mission to proclaim, and which brings to all men happiness and salvation. Brethren, pray for us.

We present, as our President-elect for the coming year, the Rev. Onésime Prunier, B.A., B.D., the distinguished son of a laborious Minister amongst us, and who, for the last seven years, has been the able Director of our Theological Institution.

Our sincere prayers rise to the divine Head of the Church on your behalf, that He may establish and strengthen the work of your hands.

ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH IN FRANCE AND SWITZERLAND, 1898.

DEAR AND HONOURED BRETHREN,-

It was with great pleasure that we received the Address from your Conference, inspired, as it evidently was, by a spirit of thankfulness and hope. We have also welcomed once again your honoured representative, Pastor M. Lelièvre, D.D. Many of us cherish grateful remembrances of his former visits, and his instructive and eloquent address at our open session to welcome representatives from other Conferences served to deepen our interest in your work, and to awaken it in many who had not previously given special attention to your important sphere of toil.

We do not forget that the peculiar difficulties under which you labour necessarily prevent the speedy growth of a great Church, but we rejoice that a true evangelisation is being carried on by you, while the teaching of Him who compared the growth of His kingdom to that of a grain of mustard seed prevents disheartening views as to your future. Moreover, usefulness and a vast membership are not always commensurate; "the mixed multitude" which, alas! still accompanies the Lord's host, often impairs its strength in the day of battle. The strait entrance gate which we know you are determined to preserve may tend to keep your numbers small, but it will also serve to maintain your purity.

We rejoice in the streams of spiritual influence which, originating in your Church, have fertilised the pastures of God both in France and Switzerland. The current of some of these you are able to follow, and the details supplied in

your address evoked great thankfulness on our part. To have quickened the activity of other Churches in countries where Romanism and rationalism so largely prevail, to have deepened the fidelity of your fellow labourers to the fundamental doctrines of the New Testament, are sure proofs that the divine blessing has rested upon you in no stinted measure, and that your labours have been by no means in vain,

Particularly do we rejoice in the success of your work on behalf of the young. In this land the devotion of the Romanist priest to the children is constantly before us, a devotion which you witness on a much larger scale. While avoiding the pernicious errors taught, we ought at least to imitate the wise zeal which endeavours to mould human character at its most plastic stage, and we are glad to know of the success which has attended such efforts on your part. We note that the brethren received into Full Connexion, and also your Students and Candidates, are, almost without exception, fruits of your labours in this important field. This must be a special encouragement to you. We find that those workers who are bound to a Church by cords woven in the school and home are seldom deficient in intelligence and zeal.

God has graciously given you other tokens of encouragement beyond these. While we naturally look for harvests in the fields which have been long tended, we must not forget the barren ground which calls for cultivation. You have not been unmindful of this responsibility, and the Master has shown His approval of your enterprise in the additions to your Church. That the success of our Home Mission work has been a stimulus to you gives us unfeigned satisfaction, and although the conditions in which you are placed differ materially from those of the great cities of the United Kingdom, you also doubtless find the need for varying your methods of work, though holding fast to its great objects, in order that you may "by all means save some." That in these matters you may be divinely guided is our fervent prayer. The great Head of the Church still controls its every true member. His gracious aid is not merely a precious memory of the past, but a present and blessed reality.

We join with you in the earnest hope that the encouraging signs of the past year may be but the promise of the shower which shall come upon you from above. The expectation of a revival is often a token that the Lord is about to visit His people with a richer outpouring of His Spirit, and we are glad to find that in your case that expectation is strong. May your desires be speedily realised, and the joy afforded you of seeing multitudes turned from error and sin to Him who is the "Way, the Truth, and the Life."

We were much interested in the fact that your Conference was held this year for the first time at Levallois, and that the prospects of your work in that important suburb are so hopeful. The honoured brethren to whose visit you refer in terms of such high appreciation have voiced, not only their own sympathy with you, but that of many here, and especially of those whose experiences of travel have familiarised them with the great difficulties of your work.

We trust that the reproach and hostility through which you are at present passing will soon be disarmed by the power of that righteousness which is of God. "To you it is given in the behalf of Christ, not only to believe on Him, but also to suffer for His sake." The honour involves suffering, but it is nevertheless honour of the highest order, and, we are persuaded, it is thus regarded by you.

We heartily accept the nomination of the Rev. Onésime Prunier, B.A., B.D., as your President for the coming year, trusting that he may be strengthened for his arduous duties, and that the year may be one of great and permanent blessing.

With renewed expressions of sympathy and love, we commend you to Him who is able to make you perfect in every good work to do His will.

TO THE

YEARLY CONFERENCE OF 1898.

HONOURED FATHERS AND BRETHREN,-

Our Sixteenth Annual Conference is holding its sessions in Cape Town this year, and it is a pleasure to us once more to send you our affectionate greetings, and at the same time to acknowledge with thankfulness your reply to our address of last year, manifesting as it does your continued interest in and sympathy with us in our work.

It was our privilege last year to report 47,872 Members, being an increase of 3,941, which was the largest increase we had ever been able to record in a single year; but by the good hand of our God upon us, we report this year a still larger harvest; viz. 51,906 Members, being an increase of 4,034, with 22,544 on trial, and 11,744 in Junior Society Classes. This increase has been gathered in the face of peculiar difficulties, and, in certain places, of opposition to our work. We take this as a manifest token of the favour of God towards us, and we look into the future with confidence, for "if God be for us, who can be against us?"

The affairs of our Missionary Society have this year taken a more hopeful turn. The earnest manner in which the Lay Members of our last Conference took up the cause of the Society has been productive of much good, and a deepening of interest, with an augmentation of income, has been the result.

We have received this year ten European Candidates for our Ministry. Of these, two have been appointed to Circuit work, two have been placed on the President's List of Reserve, and six are designated for Theological training. We regret that no suitable native Candidates have this year come forward, but we are thankful to report that one Candidate for the Ministry in our Indian work has been accepted.

Six Probationers, two of whom are natives, after having

successfully passed the usual tests, were, at this Conference, solemnly set apart by the imposition of hands for the work of the Ministry.

We meet this year under the shadow of bereavement. Very early in our Connexional year the death of the Rev. S. Evans Rowe came as a shock to us all, and it is almost impossible for us to express the loss we have sustained through his death. We greatly miss him and his statesmanlike counsels. In the death of the Rev. George A. Theobald we have lost one who was pre-eminently a "brother beloved," saintly of character, and successful as a Circuit administrator. We bow before the mystery which removes such men in the midst and maturity of their vigour and usefulness.

Two of the veterans of our Conference have also been called to their eternal reward. The names of Henry H. Dugmore and William C. Holden can never be forgotten in South African Methodism. They rest from their labours, but in an especial sense "their works do follow them." Each was a remarkable man in his own way, and each has left an indelible impress on the history of our Church in this land.

Your appointment of the Rev. James Thompson, M.A., to the office of President of our Conference has given general satisfaction. His name is well known, and he himself is held in high esteem, not only by us, but by numbers outside our own Church. It is almost needless to say that he has guided the business of the Conference with the dignity and ability befitting his high reputation.

We nominate the Rev. William Wynne as President for the year 1899, and request you so to appoint him. He has for twenty-eight years exercised a successful Ministry in South Africa, and has travelled with acceptance in several of our most important Colonial Circuits.

We still retain an unabated interest in all that concerns British Methodism, and pray that you may continue to receive the blessings of Almighty God.

We commend ourselves and our work to your sympathies and prayer.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,-

We have received the Address of your Conference with gratitude to God, and most heartily do we reciprocate those sentiments of affection and loyalty to which you have given expression. Our interest in you and your work, which has suffered no diminution, leads us to watch with a solicitous eye every movement that concerns your welfare.

We notice with special pleasure the unprecedented increase that has taken place in your membership. We pray that the abundant success which the great Head of the Church has given to you may be an incentive to more earnest efforts and an encouragement to nobler ventures of faith. If your history is but brief, it is a history of glorious achievements; and it is impossible for us to think of it without exclaiming, "What hath God wrought!" It is very gratifying to us to learn that in a time of great political unrest the word of the Lord has had free course, and has been glorified.

We congratulate you upon the more hopeful turn which your Missionary affairs have taken, and are glad to learn that the Lay Members of your Conference have done their part in removing the financial embarrassment that you had long felt. We are convinced that the co-operation of Ministers and Laymen in Missionary effort must be productive of much good. Our own experience leads us to attach the greatest importance to the efforts of the Laity in all the aggressive work of the Church.

We are glad to notice that you have received ten European Candidates for your Ministry, and that the greater part of these are to undergo a course of theological training before entering upon the actual work of the Ministry. It is exceedingly desirable in these days, when education is rapidly spreading, that all Ministers should be thoroughly equipped for the efficient discharge of the duties of their office. We believe that you are pursuing a wise policy in endeavouring to secure native agents for work among the natives, as it is only by a devoted native Ministry that this department of your work can be efficiently carried on.

It has been with deep regret that we have heard of the losses you have sustained by death. The Rev. S. Evans Rowe for many years occupied an honourable place in our Ministry, and his gifts, both as a preacher and administrator, were highly valued by us. We have an affectionate remembrance of his visit to us at the Conference of 1896. We are convinced that his death has been an irreparable loss to you. The Rev. George A. Theobald was esteemed by us as a Minister of high character and of great usefulness. We trust that these losses will be overruled by the wise providence of God for the furtherance of the gospel among you. In times of great bereavement we find comfort in remembering the saying of our venerable founder, "God buries His workmen, but carries on His work."

We heartily and unanimously approve of the nomination of the Rev. William Wynne as your President for the year 1899. He is known to us as one of your most able and successful Ministers, and we rejoice in the gifts with which God has endowed him. We trust that his year of office may be one of great happiness to him and of rich blessing to you.

We have to rejoice over the success which God has graciously given to us. The past year has been one of great activity in many directions, and we report a net increase of 3,279 in our

Membership.

Our Conference has been one of the most important in the whole history of Methodism. Ministers and Laymen manifest a spirit of great hopefulness, and are confidently expecting that the coming year will be marked by a great revival in all our Circuits. With perfect unanimity and great heartiness the Conference has adopted the Twentieth Century Scheme, and an appeal is to be made to the members and adherents of our

Church to raise a sum of One Million Guineas as a thank-offering to God.

We earnestly pray that the blessing of God may rest upon your work in ever-increasing measure, and we solicit your prayers in our behalf.

EIGHTH GENERAL CONFERENCE

OF THE

AUSTRALASIAN WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH

TO THE

BRITISH CONFERENCE.

HONOURED FATHERS AND BRETHREN.-

We greet you in the name of the Lord. "Grace to you and peace from God our Father, and the Lord Jesus Christ." The tie that unites us to you is strong, and tender, and sacred. Though dwelling at the ends of the earth, and separated from you by great oceans and continents, we are essentially one with you. We are your spiritual children, inheriting like privileges and obligations, and inspired by the same motives and hopes. Reverently and gratefully our thoughts turn to you. We watch from afar your manifold labours and successes, and are ourselves aided and strengthened by the example of your zeal and devotion. Your firm adherence to sound doctrine, and to all those great Christian principles for which Methodism has been distinguished, is also a stimulus to us to walk by the same rule, and mind the same thing.

We have received with great pleasure your address in reply to ours sent from the last General Conference, and are thankful for the interest you have expressed in our work in

Australasia and Polynesia.

Since the last General Conference closed its sessions in Adelaide, our Church has sustained repeated bereavements. Among the veterans who have fallen are such men as Isaac Harding, Samuel Ironside, James Bickford, Thomas Raston, George Daniel and William Poole Wells. Younger men have likewise been taken, notably the beloved and consecrated Robert Morris Hunter, cut down in the prime of his years. Some of our leading laymen have also died, the name of

Charles Drew occupying m this list a foremost place. We have missed likewise from our counsels in the present Conference men whom Methodism has most delighted to honour. There has been a touch of pathos in the absence, through the slow accumulation of years, of such a quartette of worthies as the Rev. Dr. Waugh, John Watsford. John Cope, and William A. Quick. But the God of our fathers is also our God. "The best of all is, God is with us."

The General Conference of 1897 has been held in Pitt Street Church, Auckland, New Zealand; under the efficient Presidency of the Rev. Henry T. Burgess, who, during a lengthened ministry in Australia, has rendered important service to the Methodism of these lands. The last General Conference held in this Colony was in 1884. Methodism has strongly established itself here; it is a potent factor in shaping the life and destiny of the people. Full of life and vigour, it is essentially loyal to the pattern received. Its growth has been rapid and sure. Auckland itself is a strong Methodist centre, and the attachment of our people to their Church is warm, living, and real.

The place occupied by Methodism in Australasia is an important and responsible one. The strength of our Church is partially indicated in our statistical returns. We have 55,878 Church Members, with 2,605 on trial for membership, and 5,280 catechumens, while our attendants on public worship number 362,325. Added to this we have in connexion with our South Sea Missions 35,133 Church Members, 5,752 on trial, 11,741 catechumens, and 123,795 attendants on public worship. The rapid growth in the population of Western Australia, consequent upon the opening up of the gold-fields, has led us to vigorous effort in that quarter; and so great have been the successes achieved that the General Conference has constituted the Western Australia District a separate Annual Conference. The new arrangement is to take effect in the year 1900.

The proposal to unite the various sections of the Methodist Church throughout Australasia into a compact and organic unit, in accordance with the resolutions of the General Conference of 1894, is being carried into effect. In New Zealand a partial amalgamation has taken place. Three out of the four branches of Methodism have united, but the Primitives have elected to remain apart for the present. The union of

the Methodist Churches in Queensland has been definitely agreed upon, and is fixed to take effect in 1898. In South and West Australia the union of all the Methodist Churches is on the eve of accomplishment, what is regarded as the test vote having already been taken. In the colonies of New South Wales, Victoria, and Tasmania, the subject of Methodist Union holds a foremost place, and Members and Trustees in large majorities have declared themselves in its favour. We are grateful for the progress the Union movement has made, and trust that in the near future the Methodism of Australasia will be one and undivided.

The duty of our Church in relation to the heathen has engaged the earnest and prayerful attention of the Conference. The Rev. George Brown, D.D., the honoured General Secretary of Foreign Missions, has recently paid an official visit to the Islands, and reports favourably of the work that is being done by our Missionaries. He regards the progress made in New Britain and New Guinea as wonderful. The Rev. Frederick Langham, after a long and honourable career in Fiji, has returned to the Colonies, and is now engaged in bringing out a revised edition of the Seriptures in the Fijian language, under the direction of the Board of Missions.

In view of our increasing responsibilities, and the need for an augmented income, the office of Organising Secretary has been created, and the Rev. Benjamin Danks has been appointed to that post. The question of extending our field of operations to Asia and Japan has been favourably discussed, and is remitted to the Board of Missions and to the Annual Conferences for further consideration. Perhaps one of the most remarkable features in connexion with the Church life of the Australasian Colonies at the present time is the wave of Missionary enthusiasm that has swept over our young people.

We do not forget that the footing we have gained as a Church in these young communities involves serious responsibilities, offering as it manifestly does the largest opportunities for usefulness. We are anxious to do the work so entrusted to us, and to do it well. The same vices that flourish in other lands have established themselves here also. The problems demanding solution at your hands appeal to us with equal urgency. Added to this, we have needs and perils that are our own. But we have discovered no new secret of success in our warfare with evil. The old weapons are still the only

ones that are effective. We do not undervalue accessory means. We allow the necessity of adaptation in our methods of working, but we believe that the gospel alone is the power of God unto salvation.

"Now unto Him that is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us, unto Him be glory in the Church by Christ Jesus throughout all ages, world without end. Amen."

TO THE

GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA, 1898.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,

We gladly embrace the opportunity afforded by the assembling of your General Conference to convey to you our fraternal greetings, and the expression of our affectionate interest in all that pertains to your welfare and progress. The lapse of time serves only to prove how deeply your Church is rooted in the national life, and how important is the part it takes in the development of your institutions. We cannot review your history, as it has been so graphically described in the centennial memorial volume, nor can we contemplate the strength and vigour which from small beginnings your Church has reached, without wonder and gratitude. Verily we may say, "What hath God wrought!" His guiding hand is seen in every stage of your advance; and, in spite of human error and frailty-and, sometimes, even using these for His own gracious purposes—the great Head of the Church has brought you to a position of prominence and influence which we cannot doubt will make you, if faithful to the opportunity created, a mighty power for the salvation of your own country, and an instrument in His hands for hastening the day when the kingdoms of this world shall become the kingdoms of our Lord and of His Christ. Your phenomenal

increase of late years is doubtless due largely to the union of the several branches of the Methodist family in one undivided Methodist Church, and to the advantage this has given you in undertaking new work in new communities. Your valuable universities and colleges, and the use you are making of these to secure a higher standard of ministerial efficiency, contribute very largely to your success; and also the wise adaptation of your economy to the conditions and needs of the times and of the places in which you labour. But high above all these human arrangements, and in them all, we recognise with unfeigned gratitude the evidence that the Lord God of our fathers is with you. There is no real and abiding success without that divine agency which quickens into life souls that are dead in trespasses and sins, which leads to a conscious reconciliation with God, and to the new birth which is manifested in the Church by the fellowship of saints, and in the world by the strength and beauty of a holy life. We are convinced that the scepticism of the age must be met, not only by intelligent and forceful preaching of the word, but by the testimony of Christian experience, and by those miracles of the dispensation of the Spirit-constantly repeated, yet ever new-by which God reveals Himself in the work of His grace and fulfils the promise of our Lord to His disciples that "greater works than these shall ye do, because I go unto My Father."

Since we last addressed you the celebration of the sixtieth year of the reign of our beloved Queen has been the occasion of enthusiastic rejoicing in all parts of the British empire. In the remarkable demonstration which took place in London last year, we rejoiced greatly that the representatives of the Dominion of Canada were so conspicuous and distinguished. This event has served to illustrate, not only the extent and power of the empire, but the oneness of purpose and sentiment possessing the great peoples that in different parts of the world are united under the same supreme authority. There are many evidences that English-speaking people and the subject races under their sway are drawing together more closely than ever. For this we cannot but be thankful, not that it may minister to national vanity, to the pride of empire, or the thirst for power, but because we believe it to be the mission of our race, in the purpose of the supreme Ruler, to use power in order to secure to the world the blessing's of peace, of free institutions, and above all of a pure, Bible-loving, Christian faith.

The position occupied by the Methodist Church, both in the Old Country and in Greater Britain, gives to us a special responsibility. It was not without significance that the great Evangelical revival under Wesley took place at a time when new countries were first beginning to attract the older populations. The Methodist Church has in the past exerted a mighty influence for good in the formation of the colonial empire, and, if faithful, will make itself felt everywhere in moulding and directing the future that is opening before us.

Of late years we have encouraged our people in this country to take a larger share in discharging the duties that devolve upon us as citizens. We cannot think it right to leave public offices in the hands of irreligious and superstitious men. Members of our Church are now rendering faithful service to God and to the State in the House of Commons, in county, city, and town councils, in boards of education, and in the administration of the law.

The Evangelical Free Churches in England have recently entered upon a closer fellowship in a movement which we are assured has no political purpose, nor necessary antagonism to any other section of the Church, but which is intended to exhibit the essential unity of those taking part in it, to maintain the scriptural idea of the Church, to promote united effort for the salvation of the people, and to present a combined front against the insidious attacks of Romanism, which in late years have been more dangerous inside the Established Church than out of it.

Our Conference just closing has been characterised by a special sense of the divine presence. The devotional exercises have received more than usual attention, and have been seasons of great blessing. Peace prevails through all our borders. We are again able to report a considerable increase in our membership. This, however, owing to our methods of computing Church membership, is an incomplete indication of the progress we are making. About forty additional Ministers have been called out by this Conference to meet the expansion of our work at home, whilst the revived interest in Foreign Missions has justified us in sending out sixteen additional Missionaries.

In chapel-building we have had a record year. The outlay

on new schemes sanctioned during the year exceeds £400,000. This includes several costly projects for the erection of large halls in the great centres of population, designed especially for the working classes. Our Missions in the large towns have been eminently successful, whilst some old chapels, in the midst of poor populations, that were at one time a difficulty, and almost a despair, have been so adapted to the new conditions that they are crowded with the very people we most desire to reach.

Our trust property was never in easier financial circumstances. We have expended nine millions sterling on new undertakings during the last thirty-five years, and yet the total debt on our entire property does not exceed one year's income from the same. Our Chapel Fund for Loans without interest has assisted in the extinction of a large amount of debt—the money previously paid in interest having been made available for the payment of debt. From this fund a sum of nearly £500,000 has been lent or re-lent to trustees of chapels, who have repaid the same in equal half-yearly instalments with perfect regularity.

We have resolved to celebrate the advent of the twentieth century by raising a Fund of one Million Guineas, to be applied in the erection of new chapels, halls, and schools, in the promotion of education, in aid of Home and Foreign Missions, and in the erection of a Memorial Building or Church House in the West End of the metropolis. The special feature of this effort is that we are to aim at raising one million guineas by the gifts of one million Methodists. By this means we hope, whilst receiving the large contributions of wealthy friends, to secure the co-operation of all our people—even the poorest. The resolutions on this subject have been arrived at with perfect unanimity, and we trust that the financial result will not be the most important benefit, but that the spirit of prayer and consecration associated with the effort may be followed by an increase of spiritual power.

We were gratified to welcome again your honoured Representative, the Rev. E. H. Dewart, D.D., whose pulpit ministrations and able and lucid exposition of your aims and work were highly appreciated.

This address will be conveyed to you by our Representative, the Rev. Walford Green, one of our ex-Presidents. We commend him to your affectionate regard as a brother greatly 458

beloved, who has long held a front-rank position in our

Ministry, and in the councils of our Church.

"Now unto Him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of His glory with exceeding joy, to the only wise God our Saviour, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and ever. Amen."

IV. CONNEXIONAL SUNDAY-SCHOOL UNION.

2 AND 3, LUDGATE CIRCUS BUILDINGS, LONDON, E.C.

The total number of Schools reported this year is 7,225, an increase of 29, and the total number of Scholars 969,484, a net increase of 6,696 on the year, and an increase of 4,262 above the number ever presented to the Conference. The careful enrolment of children who are now outside all Sunday Schools should bring us very near the grand total of a million by the beginning of the new century. Twelve Districts report decreases of 8,380; and 22 Districts report increases of 15,076, leaving the net increase as above stated.

The increase of 817 Teachers in Church membership, the substantial increase in the average afternoon attendance of Scholars of 3,805, the unbroken tendency shown for several years past to retain our Scholars who are above 15 years of age (the increase this year is 3,350), and the gratifying increase of Scholars in full Church membership of 2,120, and of 1,644 added to our Junior Society Classes, and an increase of 81 Schools connected with the Connexional Sunday School Union, are cheering features.

Two columns in the returns, however, give the Committee considerable anxiety; vis. the decrease in the attendance of Teachers and Scholars at morning school, and the reported decrease of Schools using the Catechisms. The average morning attendance of Teachers shows a falling off of 891, and of Scholars 3,852. The decrease of the latter is accounted for through the falling off of the Teachers' attendance, for the Teachers hold the morning attendance of Scholars in the hollow of their hand. Where Teachers attend with enthusiasm the Scholars are found; and unless all our Sunday-school authorities take this subject deeply to heart, the decrease in the morning School will mean decrease in juvenile attendance at Sunday morning worship in our chapels.

The intense excitement connected with Saturday afternoon sports, and the excursions and "outings" extending to late on the Saturday night, account more accurately for this lamentable fact than even the late hours of toil at which many of our Teachers and Scholars are kept; though, undoubtedly, the cause in part is found in the physical exhaustion

consequent upon the prolonged strain of Saturday night work.

The other matter is that of the decrease of I18 Schools in which neither the Conference Catechisms nor the Tablets are used. There is a widely expressed desire for the new Catechism. and probably an appreciable number of our Schools are awaiting its publication. The Committee has again, during the year, given special attention to the subject of Catechetical Teaching, and has circulated many thousands of copies of a pamphlet prepared by the Union, urging all our Schools to use the Conference Catechisms, as the Conference itself has so repeatedly recommended. The extreme gravity of the matter has been emphasised, and the Committee has shown that the precise method of teaching is left to be determined by the School, whether by the Teacher in the class, or by the use of the Tablets; or in those instances in which Teachers neglect to use the Catechism books or the Tablets (whether the non-use of our Catechisms arises from inability to teach or from indifference), it has been pointed out that a very impressive and effective way of teaching

still remains open, vis. the catechising of the whole School from the desk. While the Committee believes the publication of the new Catechism will revive the much-needed interest in the subject on all hands, it realises keenly the difficulty of making operative the repeated and urgent recommendations of the Conference.

The Committee looks to our Ministers and experienced Officers and Teachers to introduce into all our Schools, as systematically as possible, the teaching of the Catechism, and, if in no other way, from the desk instead of the usual address. Experience has proved that a well-prepared catechism lesson given to the whole School from the desk has not failed to interest both Teachers and Scholars, and has also been of more abiding use than any other kind of address. As a Church we shall fail in our duty to the children if we do not definitely and systematically teach our distinctive doctrines.

Children's Sunday was universally observed, and the observance becomes more impressive year by year, and more fruitful in the best results. In October the Committee issued special literature to every School in the Connexion, suggesting the best methods of utilising the opportunities of the day, and inviting the affectionate co-operation of Ministers as well as all Sunday-school workers.

The Secretary has organised Conventions of Sunday-school Teachers wherever practicable, and has been greatly assisted by local Sunday-school workers, who have given much thought and labour to secure the attendance of village Teachers at great central gatherings. Suggestions as to improved methods of work and specimen lessons have been given, and as a result there has been the awakening of interest and the deepening of spiritual life.

The appeal of our Irish brethren for the inclusion of the Sunday Schools of Ireland in the benefits of the Union has had attention during the year, and the Committee recommends the Conference to permit the affiliation of Irish Schools upon the same terms, and to extend to them the same advantages, as in Great Britain.

The Literature of the Union has had encouraging support during the year, and trade generally is healthy. The Lantern Department has shown a most remarkable development, and the special efforts of the Union to provide Illustrated Services for Mission Work and Religious Services for Children, through the aid of the lantern, have been well supported.

PLEASANT SUNDAY AFTERNOONS AND ADULT BIBLE-CLASSES.

In accordance with the direction of the Conference of 1895 the Sunday-school Union Committee addressed a circular to every Superintendent Minister, when the Sunday-school Schedules were issued, asking him to assist in carrying out the Conference resolution. The returns, as now presented, were reported to the Quarterly Meetings in March and to the Synods in May, and each Schedule bears the signature of the Superintendent Minister.

The Committee of the Union has done everything in its power to secure accuracy, and thus to report to Conference the Adult Bible-classes and Pleasant Sunday Afternoons not connected with Sunday Schools.

APPENDIX IV.

ABSTRACT OF THE REPORT

OF THE

CHILDREN'S HOME AND ORPHANAGE.

During the year ending March 31, 1898, 1,177 children were resident in the several Branches of the Children's Home. Besides these, 132 were helped for a time by our Girls' Refuge, or lodged in our Holiday House. These numbers show an increase of 44 residents, and 31 others, as compared with the last year: a fact which goes far to explain the increase of expenditure. Together with this should be remembered the higher price of provisions and some other necessaries during a portion of the year.

The new year began with 435 residents in the London Branch, 210 at Edgworth, 146 at Milton, 139 at Birmingham, and 44 at Ramsey. These numbers will be varied by the exchange of Farnborough for Gravesend, and the consequent reduction of numbers in that Branch to 100. But the Edgworth Colony will be increased to 240, and the Birmingham Colony to 175. In Canada and the Emigration Department, a further number of 49 should be added, for comparison with last year. Beyond this total we cannot go, unless the financial position of the Home should soon, and substantially, improve.

The subscribed ordinary income has been £20,020: an increase of only £33 over the previous year. The local income of the several Branches has been £4,044. The total ordinary expenditure has been £25,798. This is an excess

of expenditure over income of $f_{1,722}$.

Further, the expenditure on property at the several branches has been (excluding Farnborough) £11,033, of which £4,923 has been anticipated by allocation of legacies and special gifts: and £1,500 is covered by amounts yet to be received. It follows that £4,600 has been spent on enlargements and improvements of our properties, which will have to be met by incoming legacies or special donations.

The erection of the new buildings at Farnborough has not

been accomplished as quickly as was hoped, and will extend far into the new year. The complete account will be presented next year: but the erection of this greatly needed new Branch (as a substitute for Gravesend, where we have been in hired premises hitherto) makes necessary a special appeal for £5000.

This expenditure, though so large, has been necessary to the proper development and equipment of the entire Institution. Even yet, some further outlay is desirable at various points; and especially in the provision of several more houses. But, however painful the lack of accommodation, the Committee cannot venture further until at least the £5,000 now

specially asked for is obtained.

The original work of the Home has been in no degree altered or neglected. It is caring for the orphan and outcast. Of these some cannot, and some ought not, to be brought within the range of the Poor Law administration. The Children's Home will continue, whatever developments may await its work, to care for those who are in most dire and urgent need, social and spiritual; and this without respect to whether any money be or be not forthcoming, from any source, to assist in their maintenance.

The experiment of helping epileptic children is being tried on a small but interesting scale. The appeals on behalf of such children have not been as numerous as was expected, and unforeseen difficulties have delayed our obtaining suitable premises for them. Temporary arrangements have enabled us to receive and aid seven such cases. Nothing more pitiable can be conceived than the condition of these young sufferers. It cannot be doubted that in many cases their sufferings may be greatly alleviated, and their lives be made brighter and more useful. It remains to be seen how far Providence will lead us in this department of our work.

No doubt remains as to the possibility and desirability of the attempt to save Methodist and other Nonconformist children from the workhouse system. Since the last Conference eighty-four such children have been received. Forty-seven Boards of Guardians are contributing more or less to their expenses; and the effort has the hearty approval of the Local Government Board. The chief hindrance to a rapid extension of this work is the lack of house accommodation. If this were provided by the gifts of generous friends, it would soon

be possible to say that there is no longer a Methodist child in any workhouse school.

Meantime nothing can so forward the fulfilment of these hopes as the speedy liquidation of the adverse balance.

APPENDIX V.

ABSTRACT OF THE REPORT OF THE TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

WE report this year 4,634 Bands of Hope, an increase of 116, with a membership of 439,525, an increase of 9,921; and 1,553 Temperance Societies, an increase of 119, with 87,389 members, an increase of 2,463.

We wish our finances were equally flourishing. The income is almost the same as last year. Our necessities, however, require about double our present income. The Committee keeps out of debt, but can only do so by withholding its hand from work which urgently requires attention.

We are able to report little progress in Parliament. This aspect of the question is dealt with in the Resolutions to be found in the body of the *Minutes*. During the year 524 Memorials have been sent to the Government from the December Quarterly Meetings, and 400 Petitions to the House of Commons from the March Quarterly Meetings, on the subject of Sunday Closing.

The recommendations of the last Conference concerning the Band of Hope Jubilee were generally observed.

Temperance Sunday is, we believe, observed year by year with more care; but there is great room for improvement in this matter. Whatever difference of opinion there may be amongst us on the question of total abstinence, we are one in our abhorrence of drunkenness, and in our horror with respect to its awful consequences. The Committee can therefore see no difficulty in the way of the universal observance of the recommendation of the Conference.

This year has been one of severe bereavement. Together with the whole Temperance world we are called to lament the death of Miss Frances E. Willard, that noble Methodist lady who did so much for the realisation of the great ideal of a world-wide organisation of women in the cause of Temperance, and in all other great causes of philanthropy and social reform.

From our own midst have gone Jabez Woolley and W. O. Quibell, both of whom were earnest supporters of the Temperance cause with generous gifts of money and with personal advocacy, and the latter of whom was for years an active and useful member of this Committee. Death has also called from our midst J. V. B. Shrewsbury, whose tender brotherliness towards the fallen will always be a fragrant memory, and who was a model of how to speak Temperance truth in love. Last of all, we must name the irreparable loss which we have sustained in the death of William Fiddian Moulton, M.A., D.D. Of late years Dr. Moulton was one of the most regular attendants of this Committee, and no one can estimate the benefits which this department derived from his sagacious counsels.

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The Gross Profit on the year's working amounts to £512 9s. 9d., to which must be added the balance on last year of £5 10s. 7d., making £518 os. 4d. to be distributed by the Committee at its meeting in October.

The above Tables will show how great is the advantage of the Common Cash system to the Funds of Methodism. All Funds that have to borrow obtain their overdrafts on the lowest possible terms, vis. the actual Bank Rate of the day, and they borrow largely from each other rather than from the Bank. Funds having credit balances obtain Deposit rate of interest; in addition to which they receive, according to the credit balances they have kept, their full proportion of profits.

APPENDIX X.

METHODISM IN WALES.

THE Conference sanctions the creation of a representative body to be called "The Welsh Wesleyan Methodist Assembly of Wales." This Assembly shall consist, at first, of twenty Ministers and twenty Laymen, elected by the North Wales Synod, and ten Ministers and ten Laymen elected by the South Wales Synod, together with the Chairmen and Financial Secretaries of the two Synods, the Welsh Editor and Book Steward, the Lay Treasurers of the two Welsh Chapel Funds, and one Minister and one Layman each to represent the Welsh Churches in London and Manchester.

Each Synod shall make its own arrangements for defraying the cost of its own representatives.

The Assembly shall meet in the month of June.

The President of the Conference, instead of attending as aforetime the North and South Wales Synods in alternate years, shall always attend and preside over the Assembly, and shall be accompanied by the Home Mission Secretary, the General Chapel Secretary, and one other Minister.

The Assembly shall nominate a Minister who shall act as its President, whenever the President of the Conference shall be unable to attend, such nomination to take place at the Assembly of the previous year; except that at the first Assem-

bly, and at any subsequent Assembly at which, for any reason, the Minister previously designated is unable to preside, the Assembly shall elect a Minister, who shall immediately enter into office.

- A. The Assembly in its REPRESENTATIVE SESSION shall, in the first instance, act as a General Committee of Review of Welsh affairs:
- I. The Assembly shall consider the state of the work of God throughout the Principality. The Welsh love preaching, and much more might be done in organising Eight Days' and Fifteen Days' Evangelistic Missions, in the employment of Welsh-speaking Connexional Evangelists, in promoting Mission methods in ill-attended chapels, in extending Sunday-school work (always a strong feature in Wales), and generally in reviving and encouraging our Welsh Churches where they are weak and declining. The presence of the Home Mission Secretary and the Secretary of the General Chapel Fund will, it is hoped, greatly promote these practical objects.

2. The interests of Foreign Missions shall be advocated at

this national gathering.

3. Steps shall be taken to revive, organise, and extend the order of Local Preachers, who are far too few in Wales, and yet most urgently needed.

4. The Assembly shall carry out the scheme (already sanctioned by the Theological Institution Committee) for the training of Candidates for the Welsh Ministry in connexion

with the Welsh University.

5. The Assembly shall deal with Welsh Book affairs, which directly concern the whole of Wales, and cannot be satisfactorily considered by two totally distinct Synods that never meet together for mutual counsel. The great impetus to education, which is the special feature of Wales to-day, makes this question more important than ever.

It might also be possible to devise methods of raising the stipends of those of our Welsh Ministers who are distressingly

underpaid.

7. The Assembly shall consider, in the interests of Wales, those great moral issues, such as Temperance, Social Purity, Lord's Day Observance, Anti-Gambling, and Peace, which the Conference has from time to time declared are a necessary part of the work of National Churches. On some of these questions, as, for example, Sunday Closing, Welsh opinion is

so enlightened that special consideration from a Welsh standpoint is necessary.

- 8. The operations of both of the Welsh Chapel Funds shall be annually reported to the Assembly. It is suggested that in view of a general Home Missionary advance the Connexional Chapel Committee and the Extension Fund Committee might favourably consider the great and urgent needs of the South Wales Chapel Fund.
 - B. In its Pastoral Session:
- 1. The Assembly shall prepare obituaries and take proper obituary notice of Welsh Ministers, who, in the very nature of things, can never be properly known and appreciated in the English Conference.
- 2. The Assembly shall consider the Stations of both Districts, and prepare a First Draft of them for submission to the Stationing Committee of the Conference.
- 3. Probationers for the Welsh Ministry, at the end of their fourth year, shall undergo their Public Examination at the Assembly, be ordained in their native land, and receive a charge in their native tongue.
- N.B.—This would not interfere with their subsequent appearance before the Conference, where alone they could be received into Full Connexion.
- 4. The Pastoral Session of the Assembly shall issue a Special Pastoral Address to the Welsh Societies, dealing specifically with Christian life and work in the Principality.
- c. The Assembly shall, in the appropriate Session, consider all Welsh Memorials and Suggestions to the Conference, which will have greatly increased weight if supported by the imprimatur of a nationally representative gathering. The Assembly may also itself make Suggestions.

In forming this Assembly the Conference anticipates that it will create among our Welsh Churches a sense of unity which cannot exist while Welsh Methodism is split into two unequal, unrelated fragments; that it will give new life, new hope, new opportunity to our people in Wales at a time when all other Churches, including even the Church of Rome, realise that a variety of circumstances have combined to make this the hour when a wise, well-directed, and national appeal to the Welsh race is more likely than at any previous period in modern history to evoke a hearty and national response,

APPENDIX XI.

COURSE OF READING FOR LOCAL PREACHERS.

COURSE OF STUDY, IN GRADES.—In Grade A a very small number of books, for the greater part of small size, has been selected. No books on special points of Dogmatic Theology have been mentioned, and the selection will represent a minimum suited for those whose leisure is small. Grade B is fuller, and contains larger and more numerous books, and also works for reading upon special points of Theology. Grade C follows similar lines, but is of a more extensive character.

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APPENDIX XIII.

ORDER AND FORM OF THE BUSINESS OF THE CONFERENCE.

THE CONFERENCE RESOLVES THAT

- 1. All questions of Policy and Finance within the province of the Conference in its Representative Session shall be settled before the Ministerial appointments affected by such questions are confirmed.
- 2. The Representative Session shall commence on the Monday following the first Lord's day after the opening of the Conference, and the discussion and confirmation of the Stations by the Pastoral Session shall be reserved until after the close of the Representative Session.
- 3. All questions which have to be brought before the Representative Session of the Conference, and are also within the province of the Pastoral Session, may, if thought desirable, be considered and discussed during the first week of such Pastoral Session, but not voted upon until after the Meeting of the Representative Session.
- 4. If any Resolution be adopted by the Pastoral and Representative Sessions respectively, which, in the judgment of the President, are in conflict with each other, such Resolutions shall not be confirmed by the Legal Conference, but shall be reported accordingly to the respective Sessions of the next Conference.

The Conference adopts the following Order and Form of Business, subject to such modifications as may hereafter be found necessary or convenient.

I. Pastoral Session.

Previously to each Conference, the Stationing Committee shall meet in London in connexion with the Annual Meeting of the Home Mission Committee, and shall prepare and issue the First Draft of the Stations of Ministers. If necessary, the Committee may meet again in the Conference town on the Monday afternoon or evening preceding the Conference.

The Business of the Conference, when composed of Ministers only, includes the following Subjects:

1. The formal constitution of the Legal Conference:

(a) Calling the Roll of the Legal Conference.

- (b) Declarations of Vacancies in the Legal Conference, caused by death, or by absence for two successive years without a dispensation, and filling up of the same.
- (c) Election of President.

(d) Election of Secretary.

(e) Granting Dispensations to absent Members of the

Legal Conference.

- (f) Declarations of Vacancies in the Legal Conference, caused by Superannuation, and filling up of the same.
- 2. Thanks to the retiring President and Secretary, and to other Officers of the Conference.
 - 3. Appointment of Assistant Secretaries.
 - 4. Appointment of hours of Conference Sessions.
- 5. Reception of Memorials, and Suggestions from District Committees; and appointment of a Committee to report thereon.
 - 6. Appointment of Committees:

(a) On Appeals, and other Cases.

(b) To report on Chapel cases which affect discipline.

(c) To prepare the Pastoral Address.

- (d) To report upon the number of Ministers from each District who may attend the Conference when Ministers only are present; and the number of Ministers from each District who may attend the Conference when Ministers and Laymen are present.
- (e) To report upon the cases of Ministers who have had Supplies during the year; the list to be furnished by the retiring President.

N.B.—(1) The retiring President on the second day of the Conference to furnish a List of all Ministers who have had Supplies during the year.

(2) Also, on the second day of the Conference to furnish a List of Preachers on his List of Reserve, with particulars of their employment during the year. (See Standing Orders 1 and 3, pp. 370, 371.)

- (f) To consider applications for the services of Probationers on the List of Reserve.
- 7. Appointment of eighteen Ministers to serve on the Nomination Committee; and also of the Ministerial Secretary thereof.
- 8. Presentation of documents legally required to be forthcoming at the Conference.

[The above Business will probably be concluded on the first day of the Conference.]

- N.B.—The Conference Prayer-meeting is to be held on the first day of the Conference at 3 p.m.
- 9. Notices of Motion.—These should be presented not later than the *second* day of the Conference; but such Notices may be given subsequently, if occasion arise.
- N.B.—No Motion on any subject not before the Conference in the ordinary course of its business can be considered until after twenty-four hours' notice thereof has been given.
- 10. Questions affecting the character of Ministers and Preachers on Trial.
 - 11. Supernumeraries:
 - (a) Ministers becoming Supernumeraries.
 - (b) Ministers retiring for One Year; a Committee on such cases to be appointed.
 - (c) Supernumeraries returning to the Full Work.
 - 12. Candidates for the Ministry now recognised:
 - (a) Candidates on the President's List of Reserve.
 - (b) Students in the Theological Institution.
 - (c) Candidates now received.
 - (d) Appointment of a Candidates' Allocation Committee.
- Report upon the Examination of Preachers on Trial;
 and Examination Arrangements.
 - 14. Preachers to be admitted into Full Connexion.
- 15. Examination of Candidates for Ordination, and their admission into Full Connexion.

An explicit declaration by each Candidate of his belief of the Doctrines of Methodism shall be substituted for the Theological Examination.

- 16. Probationers:
 - (a) Remaining on Trial.
 - (b) Now received on Trial.
- 17. Report of the Book Committee, and Supervision of Connexional Literature.
- 18. Such Reports of Committees as are necessary for the business of the Stationing Committee, including the Report of the Committee on "Appeals, and other Cases"; and on "Transfers and Reports on Probationers."

[It is expected that the above-mentioned business will, as a rule, be completed in the first week of the Conference.]

N.B.—The Stationing Committee may conveniently meet on the Saturday afternoon of the first week of the Conference.

II. Representative Session.

The Representative Session commences on the Monday of the second week of the Conference.

Order of the Business of the Conference when composed of Ministers and Laymen; so arranged as to show the Order of Time in which the several subjects may be considered.

N.B.—The Committees of the several Departments shall present Reports of their proceedings during the year, with such Statistical and Financial statements as may be required; and shall also prepare for the Conference the Business of their respective Departments.

Monday. -- Morning:

- 1. Roll of Attendance.
- 2. Address by the President.
- 3. Appointment of Hours of Sessions.
- 4. Appointment of Time and Place for holding the next Conference.
- 5. Reception of Memorials, and Suggestions of District Synods; and appointment of a Committee to report thereon.

- 6. Notices of Motion. Such Notices may be given subsequently, if occasion arise.
- N.B.—No Motion on any subject not before the Conference in the ordinary course of its business can be considered until after twenty-four hours' notice thereof has been given.

The Reserve Funds of the Company exceed £60,000, being about nine times the Annual Premium Income.

The Net Premium Income for the year ending July 15, 1898, has been £6,819 13s. 6d., and the Revenue from Interest and Dividends £2,174 4s. 8d.; total, £8,993 18s. 2d. The Losses from fire during the year were £3,603 4s. 6d.; the Grant to the Worn Out Ministers' Fund, £1,300.

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
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
