





 - Q. VII. What Ministers have DIED since the last Conference?
 - A. 1. In Great Britain, thirty-two, viz,-
- (1.) Andrew Mackintosh; who was born in Dundee in 1799. He was converted under the Ministry of the Rev. P. Duncan. In 1826 he entered the Ministry, and was appointed to Zetland, where he laboured with fidelity and success. During his forty-four years of active Ministry he displayed great diligence and independence. His habits were simple and orderly, his piety solid and fervent. In pastoral duty he paid special attention to the sick. As a Superintendent he was firm, judicious and conciliatory, and maintained peace in his Circuits in times of trouble.

He was a diligent student of Divine truth, and well read in standard theology. His preaching was earnest, and distinguished by simplicity, clearness, and variety.

He met with a serious accident, and for eight years was laid aside from public duty. During the whole period of his seclusion he was never known to murmur. He died in great peace, August the 1st, 1882, in the eighty-fourth year of his age, and the fifty-sixth of his ministry.

- (2.) John Harding; who was born at Devonport, in 1813. His parents were members of the Methodist Society. The death of his father led to his conversion in his sixteenth year. He soon became an active member of our Society. He entered the Ministry in 1839. For forty-three years he laboured in Circuit work with fidelity and increasing acceptance. At the Conference of 1882 he obtained permission to retire. His very able preaching was marked by great theological knowledge, and much fervour and animation. As a preacher to young men he was very successful. He was scrupulously conscientious in the performance of the least duty of his office. He was an exceedingly kind and trustful colleague. Throughout his last illness his patient resignation was most marked. On August 1st, 1882, he broke a blood-vessel, and in a moment or two passed away, resting on his Saviour. His last words were, 'I'm going home now.'
- (3.) Owen Morgan Jones; who was born at Penmachno, North Wales, in 1853, of Methodist parents. He gave his heart to God in youth, and in his twenty-fourth year entered the Ministry. He gave himself to the work in the spirit of entire consecration to the Head of the Church, which spirit he retained during his short ministerial course. His preaching was of a decidedly practical character, and his labours were blessed of God to the conversion of souls. His spirit was eminently meek and devout.

He preached his last sermon at Carnarvon, August 6th, 1882; and a few days after was seized with typhoid fever, which proved fatal. About an hour before his departure he bade farewell to all his friends who were present, and then sang some beautiful Welsh hymns, in which he found a striking expression of his glorious victory over the last enemy. He finished his course exclaiming triumphantly, 'Lo, this is my God! I have waited for Him.' He died, August 15th, 1882, in the twenty-ninth year of his age, and the fifth of his ministry.

- (4.) HARRY PEDLEY; who was born at Willenhall on the 28th of September, 1802. In early life he was the subject of saving Soon after his conversion he gave evidence of zeal and ability to preach, and in 1827 he was accepted as a candidate for our Ministry. In many of his Circuits his labours were signally owned of God, and he witnessed some very gracious revivals of religion. As a Superintendent, he was careful and diligent; as a preacher, earnest and effective. His attachment to Methodism was strong, and he liberally contributed to the support of its institutions. In 1868 he was compelled by failing health to retire from the active Ministry; but during the years of his retirement he cheerfully rendered such service as was possible. He conducted a Class and preached occasionally till within a few days of his death. His end was somewhat sudden, but his confidence in God was unshaken; and in his last hours he was able to say, 'It is all right;' 'To die is gain.' He died at Middlesborough, August 18th, 1882, in the fifty-sixth year of his ministry.
- (5.) JOHN LUCAS BLEBY; who was born in Jamaica, January 26th, 1843. He was educated at New Kingswood School and at Wesley College, Sheffield, where he showed considerable ability. He gave his heart to God when sixteen years of age. Shortly after his conversion he went to Barbadoes, where his esteemed father was then labouring; and to that father's training, example and prayers, he owed, under God, all that he afterwards became. In 1862 he entered the Ministry. His career as a Missionary in the West Indies was energetic and effective, every charge entrusted to him improving numerically, spiritually and financially. Illness necessitated his return to England in 1873, where, on restoration to health, he laboured with great acceptance: his genial and sympathetic nature giving him great influence as a pastor and friend. His preaching was characterized by clearness of exposition, variety, and aptness of iMustration, faithfulness of application and unique simplicity of style. His habitual tone of mind was that of deep spirituality

and seriousness combined with Christian cheerfulness, and his prayers were full of holy unction and power. In business matters he was exceedingly neat and methodical, and as a colleague he was invaluable. The final summons came suddenly, though for some time he had been aware of the uncertain tenure of his life, and had familiarized himself with the near prospect of death. But though unexpected, death could not surprise one whose life was 'hid with Christ in God.' He died at Plymouth on the 22nd of August, 1882, in the fortieth year of his age, and the twentieth of his ministry.

- (6.) James Lees; who was born at Kidderminster, in 1812. He had godly parents, and grew up in the midst of religious influences. At the age of sixteen he was converted to God. He entered the Ministry in 1836. He proved himself to be a workman needing 'not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth.' He was an indefatigable student; and his discourses were always enriched with sound Biblical truth, and marked by earnest appeals to the reason and conscience of his hearers. As a Superintendent he was a strict disciplinarian, and laborious and faithful in the discharge of all the duties of his office. After thirty years of happy and successful toil, he was obliged, in 1866, by failing health, to retire from the full work of the Ministry. He settled at Leighton-Buzzard, but continued to render what service he could. From a Theological class, which he conducted for some years, several young men passed into the Ministry. His end was sudden; but he was fully prepared. On August 26th, 1882, he had a stroke of paralysis, and after a few hours of almost entire unconsciousness he passed to his eternal rest.
- (7.) Thomas Hodson; who was born at Scarle, in Lincolnshire. When about twenty years of age he gave himself fully to God, and soon afterwards began to preach. He was accepted for the Ministry by the Conference of 1829, and appointed to Calcutta. In 1833 he was sent to Bangalore to establish a Canarese

Mission. Here he initiated the work of English education for East Indians and natives: a work which will be his enduring memorial in the Mysore. In 1837 he removed to Gubbi, and in 1838 to the city of Mysore, where he enjoyed the favour and friendship of the Rajah. In 1843, through failure of health, he returned home, and for ten years laboured with acceptance and success in English Circuits. In 1853 he again sailed for India, and for nearly a quarter of a century was spared to preside over the Mysore Mission. In the selection of suitable sites for Mission-purposes, and in the establishment of a native agency, he displayed remarkable foresight. In March, 1878, he was compelled to leave the land he loved, and at the following Conference became a Supernumerary, and settled at Mansfield.

Mr. Hodson had a manly bearing, and a bright and cheerful temperament. In character and conduct he adorned 'the doctrine of God our Saviour in all things.' The manifest aim of his preaching was to do good, and his discourses were refreshing and invigorating. As General Superintendent of the Mysore Mission, he was kind and considerate towards his colleagues, though strict and thorough in discipline. During the last evening of his earthly life he had sweet 'fellowship with the Father, and with His Son Jesus Christ,' and often exclaimed, 'My Saviour, my Jesus!' He then quietly fell asleep, and his spirit passed away, on the 9th of September, 1882, in the seventy-ninth year of his age, and the fifty-fourth of his ministry.

(8) George Carnaby Taylor; who was born at Rotherham, August 5th, 1818. He was converted to God during his apprenticeship in a Wesleyan family in Sheffield. He was accepted as a probationer for the Ministry in 1841. He was an able and acceptable preacher, sparing no pains in his preparation for the pulpit. His sermons were luminous and comprehensive expositions of Gospel truth. His high and sometimes almost irrepressible flow of spirits, not always restrained when most needing control, occasionally betrayed

him into unguarded speech. His diary attests his humiliation of soul when conscious of imprudence, and the reality of his communion with God. Some time before his death, symptoms of failing health were manifest, which developed into paralysis. In lucid intervals he expressed full confidence and rest in Christ. He died at Southsea, October 21st, 1882.

(9.) James Eacott; who was born of godly parents in 1805, at Chaddleworth, Berks. He joined the Society in 1823, and three years later believed with the heart unto righteous-Soon afterwards he began to preach, and in 1835 was received into our Ministry. For eleven years he laboured successfully in the Bahamas and Antigua, enduring hardness as a good soldier of Jesus Christ. In the transition period following the Emancipation, his discretion and firmness, his kindness and suavity, gained him many friends, and secured valuable cooperation. As the Superintendent of many important Home Circuits, he manifested, in the discharge of all his duties, exemplary fidelity and diligence. Above all, he was a preacher of the Gospel. By diligent study he had stored his mind with doctrinal and practical theology; his address was tender and persuasive, and God put the seal of fruitfulness upon his labours.

His course was eminently peaceful and happy. His contentment and trustfulness were increasingly manifest in the closing years of his life. At the age of seventy-four he was compelled by paralysis to desist from active service. For several months he was physically helpless, and at times speechless; but always calm and cheerful. When he no longer knew the members of his family, he recognised his Saviour's words, and responded with a hearty Amen to the prayers offered. Ready to depart, he expressed his faith in the atoning blood: "So freely shed for me"—for me,' he exclaimed; and his last utterance was, 'I shall soon be in heaven.' He died at Leicester, on the 25th of October, 1882.

(10.) John Nicholson; who was born at South Carlton, in the Lincoln Circuit, October 30th, 1805. He was converted to God when about sixteen years of age, and entered the Ministry in 1830. Most of his ministerial life was spent in his native county, he having been appointed to no fewer than eight Lincolnshire Circuits, in all of which he was greatly beloved and very useful. He was a diligent and thoughtful Bible student, and his preaching was often accompanied with great power and success. In public prayer, his pleadings were remarkable for intensity and earnestness, as of one wrestling face to face with God. As a Superintendent, he was uniformly iudicious, considerate and kind. After thirty-seven years' Circuit-work, failing health forced him into the comparative retirement of a Supernumerary life, and he finally settled in the Lincoln (Wesley) Circuit. He was a willing and cheerful worker, ever ready to preach the Word and to perform other ministerial duties, as health would permit; at all times cordially cooperating with the Circuit Ministers in every good work.

Three weeks before his death he preached with more than usual fervency and power; on the following day, symptoms of the disease, under which he shortly succumbed, began to appear, and he felt that his life-work was at an end. His death was remarkably peaceful. He fell asleep on the 13th of December, 1882, in the seventy-eighth year of his age, and the fifty-third of his ministry.

(11.) JOHN ROBERTS (A); who was born at Denbigh, in 1820, and died at Shrewsbury, December 28th, 1882. He was converted to God at twelve years of age, and maintained the beginning of his confidence steadfast unto the end. When about eighteen he began to preach, and from the first gave evidence of ability and usefulness. He entered upon Circuit work in 1846. The deep impression produced by his labours in his first Circuit, Alston, is still gratefully remembered. His whole course was one of faithful and persistent work; and, until the sudden failure of his health, he laboured for the term of three

years in each of his Circuits. He gained the respect and affection of his colleagues by integrity, gentleness, and goodness. As a preacher, he was thoughtful, solid, and impressive. In private life he was a pattern of purity and kindness, beloved by all who knew him. His end was comparatively sudden. After bearing acute pain with characteristic patience for forty-eight hours, he passed away to his reward, testifying that Christ was precious.

(12:) JOHN EVANS (A); who was born at Llanrwst, in 1819. His parents were members of the Methodist Society; and in early life he was brought to a saving knowledge of the truth. He removed to Liverpool while he was young, and there began to preach. At the Conference of 1846 he was received as a candidate for the Ministry. Through thirty-six years of unwearied and faithful service he spared no pains to fulfil the trust reposed in him as a Christian minister. His capacity for work was great, and he never spared himself. As a Superintendent he was methodical, diligent, and attentive to details. In pastoral duties he was very faithful and constant, specially attentive to the sick and needy; and as he took a keen interest in all the families of his flock, his visits to their homes were heartily welcomed by children and parents alike. His sermons were marked by clear and vigorous thought, simplicity of diction. apt illustration, and occasional quaintness. They were well arranged, full of instruction and evangelical truth, and not unfrequently evinced considerable expository ability and acquaintance with the deep things of God.

He also sought to contribute by his pen to the instruction and spiritual welfare of the young; and was deeply interested in every department of Methodism, and well informed in its details. His little book, Hymns of Praise, is of valuable service to the children of the Band of Hope and Sunday-school. He also contributed, for many years, the 'Miscellaneous Record,' to the Welsh Wesleyan Monthly Periodical, and, with the greatest exactness, care and good taste, compiled the

Welsh Diary. He was appointed at the last Conference to the Mold Circuit, and there he finished his earthly course in perfect peace, leaving a clear testimony that to him to die was gain. He died, December 29th, 1882, in the sixty-third year of his age.

(13.) HENEY LAUGHER; who was born at Studley, Warwickshire, December 5th, 1818. He was from early youth marked by strict morality and deep religious convictions. In his sixteenth year he gave himself wholly to God, and soon afterwards became a Local-preacher. In 1842 he was accepted as a candidate for the Ministry; and, after three years at the Didsbury Institution, was appointed to a Circuit. He had a kind heart, and a devout spirit. As a preacher he was careful in preparation, plain in language, clear in style; and his sermons, which were practical, were often attended with much unction. He was an extensive and careful reader, an ardent lover of his work, and he cherished a kindly affection for all who loved the Lord Jesus. After labouring for thirty-seven years in some of our most extensive Circuits, failing health compelled him to retire from the full work of the Ministry.

After the Conference of 1882 he went to reside as a Supernumerary at South Stockton, where, in the few months during which his life was spared, he rendered efficient service by preaching and visiting, and in forming and leading a Society-class. His death was sudden, but he was ripe for heaven. He died, January 6th, 1883, in the sixty-fifth year of his age, and the thirty-eighth of his ministry.

(14.) WILLIAM DAVIES (B.); who was born at Old Park, Salop, in 1795. He was converted to God in early life, and endured persecution for Christ's sake as a Wesleyan Minister. After a lengthened, laborious and useful course, began in 1822, he became a Supernumerary in 1868, settling at Shifnal; but such was his love for the work, that he continued to preach every Sunday till very near the time of his death. He was a diligent

student of God's word, a faithful pastor, and a devoted Christian. There was no opportunity for a dying testimony of his love to Christ; indeed, there was no need of one: his holy life declared whose he was, and whom he served. He fell asleep in Jesus, January 11th, 1883, in the eighty-eighth year of his age, and the sixty-first of his ministry.

(15.) JAMES MAYER; who was born at Newcastle-under-Lyme, in 1817. His parents belonged to the Established Church. At the age of fifteen, through the influence of a young friend he was led to decision for Christ, and at once joined the Methodist Society. Two years after his conversion he began to breach, and his success confirmed the impression that he was called to the Ministry. In 1838 he was sent to the Theological Institution at Hoxton. In 1840 he entered upon Circuit work, in which he continued without interruption till within a few months of his death. His piety was true, deep, and consistent. As a minister he was unostentatious, earnest, and faithful; his preaching was instructive, heart-searching, and effective; as a pastor, especially among the poor and afflicted, he was sympathetic, consolatory, and helpful; as a Superintendent, he was diligent, painstaking, and judicious. His disposition was warm-hearted and cheerful, rendering his society attractive and pleasant, and winning for him a wide circle of friends.

In consequence of failing health, he retired from full Circuit work at the last Conference: this was the deepest sorrow of his life. During the continued decline of his health, his mind was kept in perfect peace, and his hope was unclouded. His joyous testimonies, from time to time, were: 'I can trust Jesus; He cannot make a mistake. It is always Sabbath here.' 'Jesus hath the keys of death and the grave, and He will not turn them a moment too soon.' A few hours before his death, he asked that a psalm might be read to him, saying, 'Let it be a triumphant one.' He died in the full assurance of faith, January 13th, 1883, in the sixty-sixth year of his age, and the forty-fifth of his ministry.

(16.) JOHN BOOTH; who was born in 1808 at Kirkburton, near Huddersfield. His parents were members of the Wesleyan-Methodist Society. He was early the subject of the strivings of the Spirit, to which he yielded at the age of fourteen, and joined the Society. From the time of his conversion he became an earnest Christian worker, and embraced every opportunity of improving his mind.

In 1835 he entered the Itinerant Ministry, and for forty-five years fulfilled the duties of Circuit work. At the Conference of 1880 he retired to Mexborough, in the Wath Circuit, where, by preaching, leading a Bible and a Society Class, and diligent pastoral visitation, he laboured to the utmost of his strength until a fortnight before his departure, appropriately terminating his work by preaching two powerful sermons on the last day of the year.

His preaching, which always aimed at the salvation of his hearers, was characterized by independence of thought, and marked success attended his labours. He had a remarkable talent for conducting the social means of grace. He particularly endeared himself to the young. On his death-bed, referring to his life-work, he remarked: 'I loved it in the morning, and now I love it in the evening'; and, as life peacefully ebbed out, he was frequently heard repeating, 'Blessed hope!' He died, January 16th, 1883, in the seventy-fifth year of his age, and the forty-eighth of his ministry.

(17.) HENEY HAYMAN; who was born at Hayle, in 1818. He was the son of the late Rev. W. Hayman, a man famous in his day as a winner of souls. In the brightness of a Christian home he was led up in the right way. In early life he became a successful student. He was converted to God at Kingswood School in 1833. Soon after this he began to preach the Word of God, and was called to the Ministry of the Gospel. He laboured faithfully. He was a man of God.

In the pulpit he was calm and careful in the choice of words; and in quiet power he was an able minister of Christ, especially

and for thirty-one years did good service in the Principality. He became a Supernumerary at the Conference of 1882. connected himself with the Manchester Welsh Circuit, where, after a painful illness, he died in peace, on the 15th of March, 1883, in the fifty-sixth year of his age, and the thirty-second of his ministry. As a preacher he was evangelical and practical. His choice of subjects, method of treatment, style of composition and manner of delivery were characteristic. He was a most diligent reader of the Bible; and, in his later years especially. the Word of Christ dwelt in him richly, as was evident in his preaching: Scripture phrases were habitually woven with good effect into the texture of the sermon. He had great natural eloquence; but the chief recommendations of his ministry were his intense devotion to its duties, his sustained earnestness, and his undaunted courage in carrying out plans for the conversion of sinners.

In his own Circuit he often held revival services with great success; and his help in conducting such services was much sought by other Circuits. He was an active and careful Superintendent. When his health began to fail he was with difficulty induced to take partial rest. Work for Christ was the ruling passion; and in his last hours it was as strong as ever. Just before his spirit passed away, he said, 'I should like to live a little longer to work for God, but His will be done.'

(20.) WILLIAM KING; who was born at Carlton, Yorkshire. On leaving home to become a medical student he was exhorted by his sister to give his heart to God. Though educated amid Church of England influences he carefully weighed the merits of various ecclesiastical systems, and deliberately chose Wesleyan Methodism as the sphere in which his piety would be best matured, and his talents most happily employed. In after life, when overtures of ordination in the Anglican Church were pressed on him by a venerable prelate, he elected to abide by his earlier choice. After a brief course at Didsbury he

entered the Ministry in Cornwall, where his manly intelligence and forceful presentation of Divine truth deeply impressed his hearers. He ministered the Word of Life with increasing acceptance and success. His keen and vigorous intellect was eagerly bent on seeking to understand the revealed will of God, and in acquiring general knowledge.

His ability to master details and observe their mutual relationship, and his readiness in looking at questions in their breadth and far-reaching results, stood him in good stead as an expounder of God's Word, and an administrator of our Church polity. When discoursing on his most loved theme. the Mediatorial Sovereignty, his diction was rich, eloquent, and poetic; and was rendered still more effective by the musical tones of his well-managed voice. His prayers in public were eminently comprehensive, spiritual and fervent. His relations with his colleagues were most brotherly, courteous and trustful; and the same spirit, combined with a playful humour and sterling worth, rendered enduring the many friendships formed in his Circuits. From Theological classes which he conducted he had the joy of sending forth several young men as preachers of the Gospel. He took an active interest in relieving chapels from financial liabilities, and succeeded in placing an important Trust-estate on a safe and permanent legal basis.

His deep interest in Protestant education, and his desire to see provided within our Connexion facilities for the adequate instruction of our young people, moved him to commence, and, in conjunction with others, complete the Ladies' College in Jersey.

As a pastor, he was sympathetic and faithful, greatly beloved by rich and poor. As a husband and father, he was tender and loving. For some years he anticipated sudden death. In the Maidstone Circuit he laboured with his accustomed diligence and whole-hearted devotedness to the last moment of his life. After spending the day in active service, and preaching in the evening at Aylesford, in a moment he exchanged mortality for life, on March 27th, 1883, in the forty-third year of his age,

and the twenty-third of his ministry; and thus he 'ceased at once to work and live.'

- (21.) HENRY JOHN THOMAS; who was born in Wakefield, in 1814. In his seventeenth year he obtained the pardoning mercy of God; and in 1836, he, with his brother, was recommended for the Ministry. He spent two years at the Institution, and was ordained at the Conference of 1841. He ever laboured in the attainment and manifestation of the truth to show himself approved unto God. He ministered with acceptance in various Circuits; but, having lost his sight, he was compelled, after thirtyfive years of happy toil, to retire from the full work, and settled at Maidstone. During his residence there he was seized with paralysis. He bore his affliction with exemplary patience, and thus diffused a saintly light around his long decline, which heartened many who visited him. He was a good man: gentle and most sympathetic, and ever ready to relieve the distressed; conscientious and assiduous in the fulfilment of his ministerial duties: beloved and honoured by his colleagues, and esteemed by the people of his charge. His preaching was thoroughly evangelical and practical, and often resulted in the conversion of souls. He was candid, generous, faithful, and full of goodness. On April 1st, 1883, he calmly slept 'in death to rest with God.'
- (22.) Jonathan J. Bates; who was born in London, March 16th, 1799. His parents were members of the Wesleyan-Methodist Society. He received his note on trial for membership in 1817, and entered the Ministry in 1822. He continued in the full work without interruption for forty years. Afterwards he resided in Keighley, as a Supernumerary minister, until his death, which occurred April 2nd, 1883. During eighteen years of this time he had charge of an important Society-class; he also conducted with great acceptance Sabbath and week evening services, in town and country chapels, so long as he was able. He possessed a keen and comprehensive

intellect, a capacious and retentive memory, and great skill and force in argument. He was marked by a sturdy independence, and unflinching integrity of purpose and action. His piety was simple, reverent, trustful, ardent, and persuasive. He was 'a lover of good men,' kindly helpful to the poor.

His knowledge was extensive, varied, accurate, and easily reproduced. He was especially familiar with the great expositors and theologians of the seventeenth century. sermons were prepared with earnest solicitude, patient diligence, and much prayer. They were addressed to the reason and to the conscience, with an earnestness and a fearlessness which arrested, and sometimes awed. By the thoughtful his ministry was very highly appreciated. He was true to the discipline of his Church, and a faithful and considerate pastor. To the close of life he continued abreast of current thought by reading, enquiry and reflection. His memory suffered scarcely any perceptible lapse, and his power of reasoning seemed unimpaired. He was always cheerful, hopeful and resigned. Declaring deliberately his serene trust in God his Saviour, he passed to 'the inheritance of the saints in light.'

(23.) Joshua Priestley; who was born at Birstall on the 29th of October, 1810. His parents were Independents. In his eighteenth year, after weeks of sorrowful seeking, he found peace with God. After a course of training at Airedale College, he entered upon a charge as an Independent Minister. During the following year a change took place in his views, which led to his offering himself for the Wesleyan-Methodist Ministry. His offer was accepted by the Conference of 1838, and for forty-one years he continued in uninterrupted work. Among the prominent features of Mr. Priestley's ministerial service may be noted his skill in stimulating young people to habits of reflection, and in guiding their enquiries, especially in Bible-classes; his constant improvement of ordinary social intercourse for influencing thought and conduct, and his friendly association—ith other Churches, which often caused local Methodism to be

better known and more highly esteemed. To his junior colleagues he was often very useful, by kindly and earnest help in their studies and their work. His favourite themes were the practical duties of the Christian life. His preaching was attended with much visible result, especially in leading believers to a more intelligent hold on Christian truth, and a greater carefulness to 'maintain good works.' He became widely known by his writings, especially by his useful biographies of John and Eliza Hessel. He was strictly methodical in his habits, and a great economist of time. Always attentive to the details of official duty, he yet never relaxed his diligence as a student.

He retired from the full work in 1879, but still laboured diligently as his strength permitted. For some months before his death his health began to fail, but the end came somewhat unexpectedly. On March 28th he met his Class, and performed other public duties, though conscious of much feebleness. In the evening of that day he was threatened with inflammation of the lungs, and in a few days the solemn announcement was made to him that he could not live more than twenty-four hours. He seemed somewhat surprised, but soon remarked: 'Well, it is all right; it is well either to stay or to go.' Never was death met with a more absolute confidence as to the issue. Among his last utterances was: '"I know Whom I have believed." Not what, but Whom.' He died at Accrington, April 2nd, 1883, in the seventy-third year of his age, and the forty-fifth of his ministry.

(24.) Nelson C. Hesk, who fell asleep at Marazion, April 6th, 1883, in the thirty-seventh year of his age, and the fifteenth of his ministry, was the son of the Rev. Thompson Hesk. He was converted to God in early life, and ever after retained the evidence of his acceptance with God. He was appointed to his first Circuit in 1868, and gave promise of great usefulness. He was a devout and diligent student of the Word of God, and his sermons were rich expositions of Divine truth. Had his bodily constitution equalled his mental, he would have been a powerful preacher; but his health was feeble for many

years, and his duties were often discharged amid much weakness and pain. Extremely sensitive and shrinking, he evinced a most generous and loving spirit, and many knew him as a kind and faithful friend. But the most striking feature of his character was the simplicity of his faith in God, when struggling against failing health. It pleased God to open his path very slowly. As one prospect after another closed before him, his assurance that the right path would open in due time never faltered, and it was beautiful to note how the Father honoured the trust of His child. Almost his last words were, 'My bark is almost home.'

- (25.) Thomas Saunders; who was born in Cornwall in 1852. Blessed with a Christian home, he at the age of fourteen became a member of our Society. In 1875 he was accepted as a candidate for the Ministry. He presented religious truth in an attractive aspect and with a pure moral tone, while the evangelic basis underlay the whole. He was greatly beloved by our people, especially by the young, many of whom were led to the Saviour, and gathered into our Church, by his labours. Soon after his ordination he was stricken down; and although hopeful to the end of resuming the work he so much loved, he was submissive to the Divine will, and in his death the beauty of religion shone out even brighter than in his life. He triumphantly entered into rest, on April 10th, 1883, in the thirty-first year of his age, and the fifth of his ministry.
- (26.) George Rowe, son of the late Rev. George H. Rowe, was born at Leighton-Buzzard, on the 5th of December, 1819. He was converted to God during his school life at Kingswood; began to preach in 1839, was accepted as a candidate for the Ministry in 1842, and was received into the Theological Institution. He was appointed to a Circuit in 1845; and, with scarcely a week's intermission, he did the full work of a Methodist preacher until the 16th of March, 1883, when he was stricken with paralysis. After lingering until

April 30th, he entered into rest, in the sixty-fourth year of his age, and the thirty-ninth of his ministry. The affliction which smote him down affected gradually both thought and utterance, so that at last his speech was scarcely audible. During a lengthy lucid interval, however, a short time before his death, he manifested unabated solicitude for the welfare of his Circuit, and expressed an intense desire for the conversion of the young men. About himself he spoke with deep humility and unshaken trust in his Saviour.

As to Mr. Rowe's character, the official record concerning his sainted father is exquisitely appropriate: 'His piety was serious without moroseness, and cheerful without levity.' He was a good preacher, sensible, solid, instructive, practical and full of energy. As a pastor he was diligent and discriminating, showing himself the warm friend and wise counsellor of all classes; while to his brethren his kindness was constant and devoted. He was blessed with strong sense, sound judgment, good temper, and much patience; and was thus well qualified for the office of Superintendent. In this position he was at his He discerned the bearing of things temporal upon things spiritual, and gave himself, with unstinted devotion, to the work of Circuit adminis ation. Probably few men have borne in mind to better purpose the direction of our founder—that a Methodist preacher 'is to mind every point, great and small, of the Methodist Discipline.'

(27.) WILLIAM HENLEY; who was born at Torquay in 1810. His parents were earnest, consistent Wesleyans when Methodism had not secured a foothold in his native town. For a long time a service was held in a village about three miles from the town, and thither, with his more famous brother the Rev. John Henley, William was taken. In 1826 he obtained the forgiveness of sins, when he commenced preaching. He entered the Ministry in 1832; and, after quietly but successfully doing the work, at the Conference of 1863, in consequence of failing health, he was compelled to retire. For many years he was

unequal to any public duty; but it was his delight to hear the truth he once loved to declare. Shortly before his death he was smitten with paralysis. When any intimation was given that possibly he might recover, he evinced a feeling of disappointment, saying, 'I long to get home.' As long as he could speak he bore testimony to his confidence in the Atonement, and his assurance of being soon with Jesus. He died at Torquay, May 10th, 1883.

- (28.) Thomas Griffith; who was born at Tregarth, Carnaryonshire, in 1847. Blessed with a religious training, he was led in early life to a saving knowledge of Christ. He was, in 1868, called to the Ministry. He possessed superior mental abilities, which he assiduously cultivated by much reading and study. His pulpit ministrations abounded in scriptural and evangelical truths, and were marked by vigorous argument and convincing power. As a pastor, he was diligent and faithful, and being of an amiable and affectionate disposition, he was greatly beloved by the people of his charge. In 1876 he was appointed to the Carnaryon Circuit, and entered upon it full of vigour and promise. But in a few months after his arrival he was laid prostrate. From that time, for nearly seven years, he was, for the most part, confined to his room, and subject to acute suffering, which he bore with Christian fortitude and resignation. Although his longing was intense to resume his work, he bowed with holy submission to his Master's will. great pain a few hours before his death, he said, 'These sufferings will do me good; they will enable me to know my Father better. I never felt religion such a bright reality as I do now.' He died in great peace at Portdinorwic, in the Carnaryon Circuit, June 16th, 1883, in the thirty-seventh year of his age, and the fifteenth of his ministry.
- (29.) JOSHUA LEADBEATER, B.A.; who was born at Birstall, July 17th, 1839. In 1858 he was made a partaker of saving and was appointed to a Circuit by the Conference of 1864.

The firm determination he exhibited in his youth to qualify himself for a position of usefulness characterized his ministerial course. During his sojourn in the Durham Circuit he received his B.A. degree. He was an able expositor of the Word of God. As a Superintendent he was a wise administrator. He was solicitous for the welfare of our young people; and, by his large-hearted sympathy and untiring zeal, won the confidence and esteem of those among whom he so successfully laboured. Some months before his death, symptoms of declining health appeared, and on the morning of July 7th, 1883, he entered into life, in the forty-fourth year of his age, and the nineteenth of his ministry.

- (30.) WILLIAM MORGAN (c.); who was born near Aberystwyth, June 11th, 1850. He was privileged with a religious training, and in early life experienced a change of heart. In 1874 he was accepted as a candidate for our Ministry. He was of a devout and meek spirit, an affectionate disposition and a courteous manner; a diligent student and an earnest preacher. His devotion to the work of Christ was most unselfish and laborious. A beautiful simplicity of purpose marked his entire course. He entered upon his work in the Tavistock Circuit, last Conference, in much weakness and suffering, but resolutely persisted in taking his appointments as long as it was possible. His health rapidly declined. Among his last utterances were: 'I have real trust in Christ;' 'It is all right.' On the 12th of July, 1883, he entered into rest.
- (31.) Benjamin Ridsdale; who was born in Hull, in 1819, and grew up amidst godly influences. When seventeen years of age he began to meet in Class, and obtained clear assurance of pardon. He addressed himself earnestly to Christian service. In 1840 he entered the Wesleyan Ministry, and after three years' service in England, was appointed to South Africa, in accordance with a long cherished desire. Nisbett Bath Station was the centre of his fruitful labours for four years,

after which he was appointed to Cape Colony, where he laboured for nine years, when complete failure of health compelled him to return to England. For twenty-three years he fulfilled his ministry in English Circuits. His preaching was clear, earnest, and experimental. He was untiring in pastoral work, and attentive to all ministerial duties. Failing health. the result of arduous toil, led him to become a Supernumerary The last four years of his life were marked by steady decline of physical power. When no longer able to speak with facility, his countenance kindled into a sympathetic glow at any suggestion of spiritual truth, revealing the true inspiration of his life. His last illness, which extended over five months, and bereft him of power to move or speak, was borne with exemplary patience, and devout submission to the will of God. He had lowly views of himself, and would exclaim, 'I am a worm, and no man.' But trust in the Covenant-keeping God enabled him frequently to cry,

> 'He calls a worm His friend, He calls Himself my God.'

After two days of distressing pain he entered into rest, July 23rd, 1883, in the sixty-fifth year of his age, and the forty-third of his ministry. He was meek, kindly, and prayerful; a confiding and sympathetic colleague; loyal to the Church of his choice; clear and sound in judgment; gentle and attractive in social relations; and a well-equipped and diligent servant of Jesus Christ.

(32.) Lewis Jones; who was born near Brecon, in July 1811. His educational advantages were few, but the deficiency was largely compensated by careful and life-long self-culture. He was deeply convinced of sin in his eleventh year, under the ministry of the Rev. Robert Humphries; two years later he joined the Society, and shortly afterwards found peace with God: a blessing which he enjoyed for sixty years. He entered the Ministry in 1833. He travelled forty-five years in some of the most laborious and important Circuits in the North Wales

District. In 1878 he became a Supernumerary, and resided in London, where he rendered valuable service in the Welsh Circuit until, about two years ago, when his health entirely failed.

He was a man of generous feeling, obliging disposition, deep convictions, firm purpose, and strict integrity; and was entirely consecrated to his great work. As a Superintendent he administered our discipline with firmness and thoughtful care, and gained the highest confidence and esteem of his flock and of his brethren in the Ministry. His general knowledge was extensive and accurate. He was a diligent reader, especially of Divinity, and had carefully studied the theology and the institutions of Methodism. He was 'mighty in the Scriptures,' and quoted them extensively in his sermons, with aptness and correctness. His method of preaching was expository, his style plain, accurate, and vigorous; and his delivery characterized by great earnestness and solemnity. His language was select, and every sentence full of meaning. His ministry was highly edifying and useful. His affliction was protracted and severe; but his confidence and peace remained undisturbed to the end. On July 28th, 1883, he peacefully passed away, in the seventythird year of his age, and the fiftieth of his ministry.

2. In Ireland, two, viz.,-

(1.) James Tobias, born in Belfast 11th of July, 1803, was the son of a distinguished and honoured preacher of the Irish Connexion. The son, who possessed much of the marked individuality of his father, commenced the work of the Ministry in 1829, and from that time until 1866, when he entered upon the chaplaincy of the Dublin Garrison, he uninterruptedly discharged the arduous duties of the itinerancy, in many instances upon our largest and most laborious Circuits.

He was an extensive reader, and kept himself to the last well abreast of general literature. His chief study was theology; and he loved the old paths. His preaching was expository, and distinguished by great originality and freshness His power in debate was remarkable. He took decided views of subjects, and had always the courage of his convictions. The part he took in Conference discussions excited interest, and will be long remembered. He was thoroughly candid and outspoken, sometimes to an extent that some would deem rashness; but if made sensible of having inflicted pain, or having said or done a wrong thing, he would hasten to explain or express regret, and never cherished resentment. He had a heart full of generous sympathy, ever ready to relieve distress, or to put himself to inconvenience and sustain loss, in order to serve a brother, or promote the interests of a good cause.

While a devoted Methodist, he possessed a truly catholic spirit, and was often found in the pulpits of other Churches, and showed his willingness to cooperate with any to advance the common good.

He possessed great youthfulness of feeling, which in part would account for the lively interest he took in the studies and efficiency of junior ministers, and in the prosperity of the Methodist Colleges. Those who knew him best esteemed him most; and in his own family he was greatly honoured and beloved.

He commanded the esteem and confidence of his brethren in a high degree; and this was evidenced in the appointments he held, being for many years Secretary of the Conference, generally Chairman of his District, and several times elected to the highest office which it was in their power to bestow. His duties of Garrison Chaplain were diligently attended to, whether in hospital or barrack-room; and during these years he never spared himself in pulpit labours in Dublin and its vicinity.

At the last Conference he became a Supernumerary, having been in the active work of the ministry fifty-three years. For more than a year previously his health had been declining, though almost to the last he cherished the hope of recovery. He longed once more to preach the Gospel, and expressed the purpose, if an opportunity were afforded, to proclaim it with

greater directness and power than ever. During his illness he was graciously sustained: resting with unwavering confidence upon the all-sufficient atonement and promises of Christ, in patience he possessed his soul. On the last Sabbath of his life, when very weak in body, he said to a brother minister, 'I also can say,

"Welcome, sweet day of rest, That saw the Lord arise."

And I can add too,

"The King Himself comes near, And feasts His saints to-day."

He gradually sank until the 25th of August, 1882, when he peacefully departed this life, in the eightieth year of his age.

(2.) Daniel Henderson; who was born at Mullinaker, in the year 1798. He was blessed with a pious ancestry. In early life, through Divine grace, he was enabled to devote himself to God and to His service.

He entered the Ministry in 1824, and for forty-four years, in connection with the late Primitive Wesleyan-Methodist Conference, fulfilled the various duties of a Methodist preacher on many of the largest Circuits, with diligence, fidelity, and success. He was 'mighty in the Scriptures,' and an able minister of the New Testament. His sermons were remarkable for clear and logical treatment, for plain and faithful dealing with the conscience, and for the fervour with which they were delivered. He was a bold, uncompromising defender of what he believed to be in harmony with the Word of God; a man of sterling worth; unobtrusive, cautious, and reliable; and a sincere and earnest Christian.

In 1868 he became a Supernumerary, but continued to labour in the cause of God as his strength permitted. The last few years of his life were spent in much feebleness, both physical and mental, but no complaint was uttered, and he maintained his spiritual ardour to the end. After a brief illness he entered into rest, on June 7th, 1883, in the eighty-fifth year of his age, and the fifty-ninth of his ministry.

3. In our Foreign Missione, eight, vis.,

(I.) WILBERT GOFFLIE WILBERTER; was born at Bürg, near Winnenden, January 5th, 1855. His early conversion to God he attributed largely to the influence of his widowed mother's prayers. In his nineteenth year he was admitted into the Theological Institution in Waiblingen, where for two years he distinguished himself by devotion to his studies and to private prayer; then the military law of Germany required him to suspend the patient preparation for his life's high calling, and for three years he was exposed to the scathing ordeal of a soldier's life.

After this he returned for one year to the Institution, when he was appointed to the Neusalz Circuit, in Silesia, where he laboured with acceptance and success. His health, however, was so severely taxed by the demands of the Circuit and by the northern climate, that he could remain only one year. His next appointment was Munich, the capital city of Bavaria, where he had fruit of his labour, and gave promise of great usefulness. Alas! early in the year he was prostrated by a severe hemorrhage of the lungs. He lingered for upwards of four months in great weakness, but enjoyed uninterrupted peace, and calmly fell asleep in Jesus, on the 5th of June, 1882, in the twenty-eighth year of his age, and the third of his ministry.

(2.) HENRY O'SULLIVAN; who died on the 8th of November, 1882. Little can be learned of his early days. He became a candidate for the Ministry, and was received on probation by the Madras District Meeting of 1837. In the following year he was sent to labour in the Mysore District, where, after several years of probation, owing to his want of efficiency in the Canarese language, he was fully ordained to the Christian Ministry, in which he laboured till 1868. He then became a Supernumerary, and resided at Madras. For some years previous to his death he was so infirm as to be unable to undertake

any ministerial duties. He was of a quiet and unobtrusive disposition, a good man, and a diligent worker as far as his want of health would permit. He passed away after many days of great physical prostration. His end was peace.

(3.) PHILIP BAKER; who was a native of Sark. His parents were members of the Weslevan-Methodist Society. gious training led to his early conversion. Having been received as a candidate for the Ministry, he was sent to Lausanne, where he was favoured with a three years' course of study. His first station was Rouen, where he laboured hard in the midst of persecution to win souls to the Saviour, and to establish a Methodist Society. Thence he removed to Honfleur, where he toiled with characteristic zeal and devotion, dividing his time equally between the town and the ships in the harbour. In this work he was much blessed. Besides forming the nucleus of a French Society, he was cheered by seeing about one hundred sailors give their hearts to God. In 1882 he was appointed to Hayti, where he arrived in October. During the passage he sought every opportunity for speaking to his fellow-passengers of the love of Jesus; and immediately after his arrival at Port-au-Prince, he threw himself heartily into his work, in the midst of which, by a mysterious Providence, his life was cut short by yellow fever, of which he died on the 8th of November, 1882, in the twentyninth year of his age, after an illness of five days.

He was a man of much prayer, and of strong faith in God. As a preacher he was plain and practical. His appeals were directed more to the heart than to the intellect, but his sermons were always carefully prepared, and delivered with unction. He was gentle, amiable and good; and his deportment was straightforward and upright. During his illness, even when his pain was most intense, he exhibited such patience and meek submission to the will of his heavenly Father, and in his death such peace, that his illness and death were more powerful and successful than any sermon he ever preached.

(4.) ROBERT NEWTON PORTREY, who was born at Belper, September 12th, 1856, was the youngest son of the Rev. Joseph Portrey. He found peace with God when eleven years of age. He entered the Ministry in 1877; and, in accordance with his strong desire to consecrate himself to God on the altar of Missionary service, he was appointed to Calais at the Conference of 1878. After two years of faithful and energetic toil in France, he re-entered the English work, and won the esteem of his flock by his eminent pulpit ability, his genial temperament, and his readiness for every description of service. His residence in France had given him an opportunity of observing the Roman Catholic system, for which he contracted a profound dislike, and during the Missionary campaign in that Circuit he often stirred the audiences by his burning words in denunciation of Roman idolatry.

The spirit of heroic ardour which first prompted his offer for the work abroad never slumbered, and when the call came from Hayti, then decimated by disease, with a holy eagerness he responded to that call. He sailed for Hayti in October, 1882, and immediately on reaching Cape Haytien, set to work full of zeal and projects of usefulness. But the Master, accepting the intentions of His servant, suffered him only for a season to contend for the cause he loved, and conferred upon him an early entrance upon his great reward. Scarcely two months after landing he was stricken down by yellow fever. short illness he exhorted those around him to trust in Christ, and joined in hymns of praise, which weeping friends were singing round his bed. He spoke of his soul as being illuminated by the Sun of Righteousness, and exclaimed, a few hours before he died, 'This Sun will never set for me.' He passed peacefully away on December 14th, 1882.

During his stay at Cape Haytien, he won golden opinions from all who knew him. High expectations were being raised as to the great advantages the Mission would derive from his presence at its head. His ability as a preacher drew crowds to hear him. His gentle and sympathizing disposition endeared

him to many. His untiring industry as a pastor, and his attention to the educational requirements of the locality, were beginning to tell with blessed effect upon the interests of the Saviour's kingdom. His death was a blow to the cause of Protestant Christianity in the town; and amongst the solemn thoughts of the dying hour he did not forget to appeal, through his wife, to the Missionary Society at home—' not to leave Cape Hayti without a minister.'

- (5.) CHRISTIAN GOTTLIEB HILLER; who was born in Winnenden, in 1809, where he died, January 30th, 1883. When a boy he experienced to some extent the workings of Divine grace, and even then cherished the hope that he might become a preacher of the Gospel. It was not, however, until 1835 that he was truly born again. He was brought under the influence of Mr. C. G. Hiller, the first Agent of the Weslevan Missionary Society in Germany, and was led to feel the intolerable burden of sin, so that he could neither eat nor sleep. He wrestled mightily with God, until by faith he realized the forgiveness of sins; and thenceforward he rejoiced in the assurance of God's favour. He soon began to exhort sinners to 'flee from the wrath to come.' In 1864 he was admitted by the Conference as a German preacher on trial, and was honoured of God in turning many sinners to righteousness. During the last five years of his life he suffered much.
- (6.) WILLIAM JEFFORD DAVIS; who was born in Salisbury in 1810, and died in Graham's Town, South Africa, June 10th, 1883, in the seventy-third year of his age, and the fifty-second of his ministry. The son of Methodist parents, he received a wise and holy training, and early in life experienced the renewing grace of God. He offered himself for Mission work, and was appointed by the Conference of 1831 to Kaffirland. He at once proved his fitness as a pioneer by a ready acquisition of the language, and a thorough knowledge of the native character. Amidst frequent wars and tribal changes, he laboured with

faithful diligence, enduring hardness as a good soldier of Jesus Christ. His ability and success gave him a leading place amongst the heroic men whose labours have resulted in the establishment of the prosperous Mission Churches of that country. In founding Mission stations, in establishing schools, in developing a native ministry, and in preaching to the heathen, his skill, courage, and faith never failed. His service in connection with the formation of a Kaffir literature was of special His publication of a grammar and the first dictionary in that language—the result of many years of patient toil—have greatly facilitated the labours of his successors. He was an earnest, brave man, of resolute will; occasionally somewhat stern in manner and warm in debate; but exquisitely tender in feeling for others, steadfast in friendship, and loving and thoughtful as a father. He was much esteemed and beloved in all the relations of life.

After forty-five years' service in the Mission-field, his hitherto robust health failing, he returned to England as a Supernumerary in 1876. The later years of his life were shadowed by the death of his devoted wife, who for thirty-eight years had cheered and sustained him amidst the perils and trials of his eventful life. Having returned to South Africa, he had resided but a few weeks in a former scene of labour, when, after a brief but severe illness, he peacefully entered into rest, in all the confidence of Christian faith and hope.

(7.) YAU-A-LOI; an ordained native minister, who, having toiled long and earnestly for the establishment of Christ's kingdom, after a severe and protracted illness went to his reward. He was born of humble parentage in the village of Shek-fú, in 1819. At the age of twenty he was a policeman. A comrade having received a copy of the Acts of the Apostles and some Christian tracts, brought them to his home. He read them, and was convinced that idolatry was false. He wished to know more of the Gospel, but was hindered. In the year 1859 a preaching hall was opened within the walls of

Canton, where he listened to the word preached by Mr. Piercy and his colleagues. Erelong he saw that the world must have had a Creator, that men are sinful and need a Saviour, and that Christ is that Saviour. He began to keep the Sabbath and attend Class; and, having been kept on trial for nine months, was admitted into the Church by baptism.

Soon he commenced preaching Christ to his fellow-countrymen. Many listened, but few believed. His preaching was characterized by great boldness, especially in exposing and denouncing the absurdities and wickedness of idolatry. For years he preached Christ and endured severe hardship at Fatshan, then a new station: but he continued faithful. He was attentive and punctual in the discharge of his duties; and, after exercising his gifts many years, was set apart by ordination to the full work of the Ministry. During his last illness he bore testimony to the preciousness of Christ, and exhibited a noble patience and trustfulness. To the missionary who visited him, he said, 'My pain is severe, yet I dare not murmur, for I know it is God's will. Moreover, there are the precious promises of God in which I trust, and from which I derive much comfort.' He died in peace, in the sixty-fourth year of his age, and the sixth of his ministry.

(8.) FREDERICK M. WEBSTER, M.A.; was born at Kingstown, Ireland. He inherited the priceless blessing of a godly parentage; and it was in connection with special services, held by Messrs. Moody and Sankey, he was led to decide for God. He was then an undergraduate of the Dublin University. After taking the B.A. degree, he offered himself to the Irish Conference for Foreign Mission Work. He was sent to Richmond, where he spent two years. His only appointment was to Jaffna, Ceylon, where he was in charge of educational work.

His great ambition was to be a true missionary, and most diligently did he apply himself to the acquisition of the Tamil language, and to the duties of his station. From year to year he passed his examinations in the vernacular with credit. He was ever remarkable for the consistency of his life, and the earnestness of his preaching. Though his constitution was apparently strong, a slight cold very speedily developed into consumption. He was recommended to try the climate of Australia, but did not long survive the voyage. At Brisbane he passed away, in sleep, in the twenty-seventh year of his age, and the fourth of his ministry.

EXAMINATION OF PREACHERS ON TRIAL.

- Q. XV. What is the Report upon the Examination of PREACHERS ON TRIAL during the past year?
- A. The Conference receives the Report of the General Examination Secretaries, regards the results of the Examina-

tion as fairly satisfactory, and directs that an Abstract of the Report be printed in the Minutes. The Conference also directs that the Report be printed and sent to all Chairmen of Districts, to the Ministers who form the Board of Examiners, to the District Examination Secretaries, and to every Preacher on trial. (See Appendix, No. V.)

- Q. XVI. What are the directions of the Conference respecting the Examination of PREACHERS ON TRIAL for the ensuing year?

 A. 1.
- (1.) The Examination of Preachers on trial shall be conducted by a Connexional Board of Examiners, to consist of one Examiner in each subject contained in the course of reading prescribed for the four years of probation.
- (2.) In addition to the Probationers' Examination Committee, two General Examination Secretaries shall be appointed.
- (3.) Arrangements shall be made at each Financial District Meeting for a Central Examination of Preachers on trial in each District, or more than one if necessary; at which Central Examination or Examinations the Probationers in that District shall attend. In the event of any Preacher on trial being unable to pay the necessary travelling expenses, those expenses shall be defrayed, together with other expenses of the Examination, from the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund and from the Theological Institution Fund, in such proportions as the Committees of those Funds may decide.
- (4.) At each Financial District Meeting a District Probationers' Examination Secretary shall be appointed, or more than one, so as to provide a Secretary to take charge of each Central Examination in the District; and each District Secretary shall be held responsible for the efficient conduct of the Central Examination. Full and clear instructions as to the course to be pursued are to be forwarded to the District Secretaries by the General Secretaries.
- (5.) The Examination shall take place throughout the Connexion on the same days in the first week of April.

- (6.) The Examination-Papers, prepared under the direction of the Committee, shall be sent by the General Secretaries to each District Examination Secretary, whose duty it shall be to distribute them at the Central Examination, and by the earliest post transmit to the General Secretaries the Papers written by the several Probationers at those Examinations.
- (7.) The Probationers' Papers shall be forwarded by the General Secretaries to the Examiners for valuation, and each Examiner shall send to them the results of his valuation of the Papers shown by numbers, together with any remarks upon them which he may think desirable. In the case of the North and South Wales Districts, such variations from the foregoing arrangements are permitted as the Examination Secretaries may find necessary.
- (8.) The General Secretaries shall compile from the returns of the Examiners a complete Report upon the reading of each Probationer, and forward it to the District Examination Secretary, to be presented by him to the May District Meeting, together with such remarks on the Examination of the Preachers on trial in the District as he may think desirable. The numbers obtained by each Preacher on trial in the several subjects of Examination shall be entered on the District Minutes. The Resolutions of the District Meetings on the Examination of Preachers on trial shall be forwarded to the General Secretaries by the District Examination Secretaries.
- (9.) The Conference directs the General Examination Secretaries to send to each District Committee—in May—having one or more Candidates for Ordination, a Report showing the result of the examination of every such Candidate during each year of his probation.
- (10.) The General Secretaries shall prepare and present to the Conference a General Report upon the Examination of the Preachers on trial.
- 2. The following Ministers are appointed the Probationers' Examination Committee for the ensuing year; viz.,—the President of the Conference, the Ex-President, the Tutors of the

four Branches of the Theological Institution, the two General Examination Secretaries, the Rev. Benjamin Gregory, Dr. Rigg, Benjamin Hellier, and George W. Olver, B.A. The Rev. Dr. Moulton is reappointed the Secretary of this Committee.

- 3. The REV. GEORGE O. BATE and WILLIAM F. MOULTON, D.D., are appointed the two General Examination Secretaries. The Conference requests the Rev. G. A. Bennetts, B.A., to assist the General Examination Secretaries during the year.

Every Probationer who has been a student in the Theological Institution shall be examined in Greek and Hebrew, unless the Tutors under whom he studied, having taken into consideration his attainments on leaving the Institution, are of opinion that these examinations cannot reasonably be required in his case.
- 8. The Conference requires every Probationer of the second, third, and fourth years respectively to be examined in four subjects; but it expects such Probationers to be examined, as a rule, in five subjects. Probationers of the first year shall be examined in four subjects.
- 9. Every Probationer of the second, third, and fourth years respectively shall be examined in the subject marked iv. in the list of subjects for his year. Every Probationer of the first year shall be examined in the subject marked iii. in the list of subjects for his year.
- 10. Every Probationer shall present for examination as many as two books (or other prescribed portions) of Scripture, either in the original language or in English; and in every case in which a Probationer obtains less than one-third of the full number of marks for a paper on any portion of Scripture, he

is.

shall be re-examined in the same subject in the month of June following, and the results of both examinations shall be specially reported to the Conference.

- 11. Every Probationer shall, not later than the end of October in each year, inform Dr. Moulton what subjects he will present for Examination.
- 12. All Probationers whom the President of the Conference shall send into the work before Christmas, 1883, shall be examined in the subjects of their year.
- 13. The Conference directs that, with the exception of students who by the decision of the Conference are allowed to remain in the Institution for a fourth year, all Probationers not at present appointed to Circuits, including those who may return to the Institution while awaiting employment in Circuits, shall be examined in accordance with the regulations for the Examination of Preachers on Trial.
- 14. The days of Examination for the ensuing year shall be Wednesday and Thursday, April 2nd and 3rd, 1884.
- 15. Should any Probationer be prevented by illness, or otherwise, from attending the Annual Examination, the General Secretaries shall, in concert with the Chairman of the District in which he is stationed, make suitable provision for his examination.
- 16. The Conference sees no sufficient reason for the exemption of those brethren who have formerly been Ministers in other Churches from the usual course of reading and examination prescribed by the Conference for Preachers on Trial, and directs that they be required to observe such regulations.

EXAMINATION OF CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY.

- Q. XVII. What are the Directions of the Conference respecting the Examination of Candidates for the Ministry?
- A. 1. (1.) No Candidate for the Ministry shall be received who does not possess a fair acquaintance with English Grammar, Orthography, Arithmetic, Geography, and History.
- (2). A preliminary Examination by papers which shall be prepared each year by the Tutors of the several Branches of the Theological Institution in turn shall be conducted during the session of the District Meeting by a Sub-Committee of two or three Ministers, who shall value and report the answers of the Candidates. This Sub-Committee shall be elected by the District Committee. The answers shall be written in the presence of one or more Ministers, who need not be members of the Sub-Committee.
- (3.) In order to secure, as far as practicable, uniformity of valuation, figures showing the number of marks obtainable by a complete answer shall be placed at the end of each question, and no Candidate shall be considered to have passed a satisfactory examination who does not gain one-fourth of the maximum number of marks allotted to the whole of the papers.

- (4.) No Candidate who has failed to obtain the minimum number of marks in the preliminary Examination shall undergo the usual Examination by the District Committee unless in the judgment of the Committee he possesses such special gifts as to justify an exceptional procedure.
- 2. The Special Examination of Candidates for the Ministry, who have passed the District Committees, shall be conducted by a Committee in two Sections, having charge of Examinations to be held simultaneously at Richmond and Didsbury respectively.
- (i.) The two Sections of this Committee shall be constituted as follows:—
- (1.) The Southern Section, to meet at Richmond, shall consist of the Ex-President and the Secretary of the Conference; the Ex-Presidents resident in London; the Secretaries of the Wesleyan-Methodist Missionary Society (one excepted); the Tutors and Governors of the Richmond and Birmingham Branches of the Theological Institution; the General Treasurer of the Theological Institution Fund; the Local Secretary of the Richmond Branch; the Financial Secretary of the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund; one of the General Secretaries of the Examination Committee; Dr. Moulton, the Rev. Peter Thompson, together with twelve other Ministers of the three London Districts, four of whom shall be annually elected by the District Committee of each of the said Districts in May.
- (2.) The Northern Section, to meet at Didsbury, shall consist of the President of the Conference; the Ex-Presidents living in the Manchester and adjoining Districts; one of the Secretaries of the Missionary Society; the Tutors and Governors of the Didsbury and Headingley Branches of the Theological Institution; the Local Secretary of the Didsbury Branch: one of the General Secretaries of the Examination Committee; the Rev. David C. Ingram; together with twenty-one Ministers of the Liverpool, Manchester, and Bolton Districts, seven of whom shall be annually elected by the District Committee of each of the said Districts in May.

- (ii.) Two Sub-Committees, to read and report on the manuscript sermons of the Candidates, shall be annually appointed as follows:—one for the Southern Section, consisting of six Ministers, two of whom shall be chosen by the District Committee of each of the three London Districts from among the Ministers elected by it as members of the Examination Committee; and another for the Northern Section, consisting of six Ministers, two of whom shall be chosen by the District Committees of the Liverpool, Manchester, and Bolton Districts respectively, from among the Ministers elected by them as members of the Examination Committee.
- (iii.) The Literary Paper for the Examination shall be prepared in succession by the Classical and Mathematical Tutors of each of the four Branches of the Theological Institution; and the Theological Paper for the Examination shall be prepared in succession by the Theological Tutors of the said four Branches.
- (iv.) The Classical and Mathematical Tutors of the Richmond and Birmingham Branches shall be the Literary Examiners for the Southern Section of the Committee; and the Classical and Mathematical Tutors of the Didsbury and Headingley Branches shall be the Literary Examiners for the Northern Section of the Committee.
- (v.) The Examiners of the Papers in Theology, written by the Candidates, shall be appointed as follows:—each of the First and Second London, the Liverpool, and the Manchester Districts shall appoint one Examiner from among the Ministers elected by it as Members of the Examination Committee; thus providing two Examiners for each of its two Sections.
- (vi.) The General Secretary of the Theological Institution, and the Rev. Charles H. Kelly are re-appointed General Secretaries of the Examination Committee. All communications relating to Candidates, and the Reports on their sermons heard after the District Committees, must be addressed to the Rev. Charles H. Kelly, Spanish Close, Wandsworth Common, S.W.
- (vii.) The Local Secretary of the Richmond Branch of the Theological Institution, and the Rev. Peter Thompson, are

appointed to act as Examination Secretaries for the Southern Section; and the Local Secretary for the Didsbury Branch, and the Rev. David C. Ingram, to act as Examination Secretaries for the Northern Section.

3. When Candidates for the Ministry are recommended by the North or South Wales District Committee, the General Secretaries of the Examination Committee shall summon a Welsh Minister to attend the Northern or Southern Section of the Committee, who shall be a member of that Committee.

- Q. XVIII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on receiving the Report of the Committee on BOOK AFFAIRS?
- A. 1. The Conference adopts the Report of the Book Committee.
- 2. The London Book Committee shall consist of the Presi-DENT and SECRETARY of the Conference, the Ex-Presidents, the Book-Steward, the Secretary of the Book Committee, the Secretary of the Tract Committee, the Missionary Secretaries, the Principal of the Battersea Branch of the Normal Training Institution, the Governor and the Tutors of the Richmond Branch of the Theological Institution, the Rev. Dr. Moulton, the Financial Secretary of the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund, the Secretary of the Metropolitan Chapel Building Fund, · the Secretary of the Fund for the Extension of Methodism. the Secretary of the Education Committee, the Secretary of the Connexional Sunday-School Union, the Principal of the Children's Home, the Superintendents of the London Circuits, and the following additional members chosen from Ministers in London and the Metropolitan District; namely, the Rev. Dr. Williams, Frederick W. Briggs, J. Ernest Clapham, Walford Green, John Evans (B), James Smith, Luke Tyerman, and George R. Osborn.
 - 3. The REV. EDWARD LIGHTWOOD is re-appointed the Secre-

tary of this Committee for the ensuing year. Letters should be addressed to him at Dingwall Road, Croydon.

- 4. The Methodist Tract Committee shall consist of Ministers to be appointed by the London Book Committee.—The Rev. G. Steinger Rowe is appointed the Secretary. Communications for this department should be addressed to him at 25, Adolphus Road, Finsbury Park, N.
- 5. The General Book Committee, which is appointed to meet at the next Conference, shall consist of the President, the Secretary, the Ex-Presidents, and all the members of the London Book Committee who shall be duly authorized to attend the Conference; with the—

- 1. The respectful and hearty Thanks of the Conference are due, and are hereby presented, to its late President, the Rev. Charles Garrett, for his earnest, faithful, and acceptable discharge of the duties of his office, both during the Session of the last Conference, and throughout the year.
- 2. The best Thanks of the Conference are presented to the Rev. Robert N. Young for his valuable services as Secretary of the Conference during the past year.
- 3. The respectful Thanks of the Conference are due, and are hereby presented, to the ex-President, the Rev. Charles Garrett, for the earnest, practical, and powerful discourse delivered by him on Sunday morning, July 29th, in Great Thornton Street Chapel, Hull; and he is earnestly requested to publish it.
- 4. The hearty Thanks of the Conference are presented to the ex-President, the REV. CHARLES GARRETT, for the seasonable and impressive charge delivered by him to the newly-ordained

Ministers at Kingston Chapel, Hull, on Thursday morning, August 2nd; and he is earnestly requested to publish it.

- 5. The REV. FRANCIS W. GREEVES is re-appointed Convener of the Committee on Memorials and Suggestions.
- 6. The Annual Meetings of the several District Committees shall be held between the 11th and 18th of May, 1884, with the exception of the North Wales, South Wales, Isle of Man, Edinburgh and Aberdeen, and Zetland Districts.

RETIREMENT OF THE REV. JOHN DURY GEDEN .-- The Conference learns with regret that the Rev. John Dury Geden is compelled through failing health to ask to retire from the active work of the Ministry. In granting his request the Conference desires to express its profound sense of the services which he has rendered to the Connexion. It recognises the eminent scholarship, especially in the department of Biblical literature, which has enabled him not only to train a whole generation of Ministers, but also to render invaluable service in the work of Old Testament Revision. It remembers the powerful ministry in which his varied gifts have been exercised to the profit of many, and of which some treasured examples are enshrined in his published sermons as well as in his able Fernley Lecture. But, above all, it records its testimony to the high moral dignity and weight of character, which, combined with his uniform courtesy and tender thoughtfulness, have caused his name to be beloved and revered by all who have come within the sphere of his influence. It assures him of its deep sympathy with him in his affliction, and prays that in his retirement he may have multiplied to him the consolation which it has so long been his joy to minister to others.

THEOLOGICAL EXAMINATION OF CANDIDATES FOR ORDINA-TION.—The Conference adopts the Report of the Committee, viz.:—

1. That arrangements be made for conducting the Theo-

in the second

logical Examination of Candidates for Ordination at a time when the President of the Conference can attend, and when a large proportion of the Conference, including its official members, may be expected to be present.

- 2. That an explicit declaration by each Candidate of his belief of the doctrines of Methodism be substituted for the present Theological Examination.
- 3. That the attention of the Chairman of Districts be called to the following regulations adopted by the Conference of 1815, viz.:—'Pefore any preacher, having travelled four years, is recommended by his District Meeting for admission into full Connexion, he shall undergo a careful examination by the Chairman of that Meeting, respecting his acquaintance with Mr. Wesley's works in general, and especially with his Sermons and his Notes on the New Testament, in addition to the other examinations required by our existing rules; and no preacher shall be recommended unless the result of his examination be satisfactory to the Meeting.' (Minutes of Conference, vol. iv., p. 122.)

REGISTRATION OF LOCAL PREACHERS, ETC.—The Conference receives the Report of the Committee and directs:—

- 1. That the number of Local Preachers and Class Leaders shall be annually reported in the Minutes of the Conference.
 - 2. That this return shall embrace the following particulars:-
 - (1.) Accredited Local Preachers.
 - (2.) Society Classes; Junior Society Classes.
 - (3.) Ministerial Class Leaders; Lay Class Leaders; Leaders of Junior Society Classes.
- 3. That the necessary information shall be obtained from the Circuits by means of the President's Annual Circular, and that the requisite columns shall be included in the schedule prepared by the Home Mission Department for the return of the number of members in Society, etc., to the Conference.

RECOGNITION OF NEW MEMBERS. — The Conference calls ion to the Resolutions on the Recognition of New Mem-

bers in the Minutes of Conference 1878, p. 186, and directs that they be read in the pastoral session of the next May District Committees with a view to such consideration of them as may promote their adoption in the Circuits of the Connexion.

THE OPIUM TRAFFIC.—The Conference observes with regret that attempts are being made in this country to defend the consumption of opium, and the policy of the Indian Government with respect to its traffic in that drug with the people of China; and it earnestly renews the Resolution adopted in 1876, and repeated in 1879, which affirms that in its judgment the trade is immoral, and that steps ought to be taken by the Parliament of England to suppress a traffic which is a shameful stain upon the administration of India.

THE CATECHISMS IN JUNIOR SOCIETY CLASSES.—The Conference earnestly recommends the Leaders of Junior Society Classes to make systematic use of our First and Second Catechisms in their weekly meetings with the young people of their charge.

ELECTIONS TO DEPARTMENTAL OFFICES.—The Conference resolves that in any new appointment to a Departmental Office, the Minister elected shall have a clear majority of the total number of votes cast; and that when such majority is not obtained on the first ballot, a second ballot shall be taken on the first two, or if necessary, the first three names on the list which have the largest number of votes.

APPLICATIONS FROM NEW SOUTH WALES AND QUEENSLAND AND SOUTH AUSTRALIAN CONFERENCES.—The Conference consents to give to a number of accepted and trained Candidates for the Ministry the option of joining the New South Wales and Queensland, and South Australian Conferences; but reserves the consideration of the financial aspects of the case until the Lay Representatives are present.

CENTENARY OF THE DEED OF DECLARATION.—In view of the fact that the 28th February, 1884, will be the Centennial Anniversary of the signing of the Deed of Declaration, and also of the fact of the organization in 1784 of Methodism in America, the Conference refers to the Monthly Meeting of the Ministers resident in London the consideration of the best modes of commemorating these events.

RESOLUTIONS ON PASTORAL WORK.—The Conference directs that the Pastoral Resolutions contained in the Liverpool Minutes, and such other Resolutions of the Conference since 1820 as bear upon Pastoral Work, shall be collected and codified. The Rev. Joseph Bush is appointed to compile this document, and to submit it to the following Committee, who shall report thereon to the next Conference:—The Rev. Dr. Osborn, William Hirst, John M'Kenny, Joseph Bush, Richard Green, Dr. Greeves, and George O. Bate, Convener. In the meanwhile the existing regulations as to the reading of the Liverpool Minutes shall continue in force.

CATECHISM OF METHODIST HISTORY AND POLITY.—The Conference directs that a Catechism for the exposition and defence of our Ecclesiastical system shall be prepared for the benefit of our young people, and especially of those who reside in districts where the principles and institutions of Methodism are assailed. The Rev. Benjamin Gregory, in conjunction with the following Committee,—The Rev. Dr. Osborn, Dr. Pope, Dr. Rigg, Theophilus Woolmer, Edward Lightwood, and Henry W. Holland,—is charged with the preparation of this Catechism.

N.B.—The Treasurer of any District Auxiliary Society in Great Britain, and the Chairman of any District, who may be in London at the time of holding any Meeting of the General Committee, shall be entitled to sit and vote with the Committee; and the Treasurer, or Treasurers, of the London Districts' Auxiliary Society shall be regularly summoned to the Committee. Messrs. Alfred Parker, F. Porter Smith, T. H. Barlow, M.D., and Howard Barrett are requested to act as a Medical Sub-Committee.

5. In view of the fact that the world is now open for the preaching of the Gospel, that it is utterly impossible to take advantage of the openings thus offered, unless the annual income

of the Society is largely increased; the Conference, feeling the importance and necessity of the guidance and help of the Holy Spirit under this pressing responsibility, recommends:—

- (1.) That the week beginning with Sunday, November 11th, shall be set apart for intercession in behalf of our Foreign Missions—specially for the increase of liberality at home, as well as for the increase of success abroad; that the subject shall be brought before all our congregations on the Lord's day, and also before the teachers and scholars of our Sunday-schools; that Prayer-meetings shall be held throughout the week in all our Circuits, and, as far as practicable, in all our chapels and preaching places; and that suitable information shall be supplied by the Missionary Committee for the use of Ministers and others in their addresses and appeals at the several services.
- (2.) That in connection with these special services care shall be taken to arrange for an organized visitation of all the members of our congregations, and especially of those who are not at present subscribers to our Foreign Missions, and to appoint additional collectors if necessary (where local committees exist they shall be called together to make such arrangements); and this visitation shall be for the express purpose of obtaining subscriptions, however small, payable at regular intervals according to the convenience of the subscriber.
- (3.) That this visitation shall be commenced on Monday, November 19th, and that its objects shall be to increase the ordinary annual income of the Foreign Missionary Society by at least £20,000.
- 6. The Conference repeats its recommendation, that Monthly Missionary Prayer-meetings be held in connection with all our chapels wherever practicable.

THE WEST INDIAN CONFERENCE.

The Conference receives the Scheme submitted by the

Missionary Committee for the formation of two West Indian Conferences, and a General Conference to meet once in three years; and directs that a copy of the proposed Scheme be transmitted to every Minister in full Connexion in the Districts included in the proposed Scheme; that the chairman of such Districts be instructed to submit the said proposed Scheme to their several District Meetings, with a view to the suggestion of any modification of details which may be deemed desirable and necessary; that such suggestions shall be reported to the Missionary Committee, and carefully considered, with such help as the Committee may require to call in from experienced West Indian brethren, in the hope that a complete Scheme may be presented for adoption at the Conference of 1884.

N.B.—The above Resolution was adopted in both the Sessions of the Conference.

6. The Conference directs that the provisional scheme for raising the income of the Schools' Fund to meet the expenditure be the same as that adopted at the Conference of 1881, and that the sums to be raised by the various Districts be the same as those named in the Minutes of Conference of 1881, pp. 225-6.

N.B.—The payment of £2 for each child by Ministers in Circuit work, having children at the Schools, is in addition to the subscription of one guines.

7. CLOTHING.—The Conference of 1882 directed that after Midsummer, 1882, the Governors of the School for Boys should

cease to provide clothing for the boys; and that this rule should apply to the sons of Supernumerary and Deceased Ministers, except in cases of extreme need.

- 8. The Conference directs that the action of the rule adopted by the Conference of 1881 (Min. Conf. 1881, p. 224), 'that the number of years which a boy may spend at School without payment be reduced from six to five,' be suspended for the year ending at the Conference, 1883, and that its application and enforcement for the following year be left to the discretion of the General Committee.
- 9. KINGSWOOD SCHOOL EXTENSION.—The Conference directs that the Building Committee be re-appointed to complete the accounts during the year.
- 10. WOODHOUSE GROVE SCHOOL LIMITED.—The Conference directs that the fee for Ministers' sons at Woodhouse Grove School be £21 for the year 1883-4.
- 11. POCOCK SCHOLARSHIP.—The Conference approves the following scheme:—
- (1.) That for the next three years, dating from Midsummer, 1883, the Pocock Scholarship be awarded to the most deserving boy or boys among those who have received five years' education or educational payments, and who wish to remain at the School, but would otherwise not have obtained a sixth year (regard being taken to the circumstances of the boy's parents as well as to his own qualifications).
- (2.) That for the next two or three years after 1885 the Scholarships be offered in one or more amounts as a reward to those boys who pass the best examination among the candidates for entrance to the School in each year.
- (3.) That full notice of the intention of the Trustees to devote this Scholarship to prizes in the entrance examination be given to all Ministers at the next Conference, and inserted in the Minutes.
- 12. DAUGHTERS OF MISSIONARIES.—The Conference directs that discretionary powers shall be allowed, in certain exceptional cases, to the Governing Body of the Girls Schools, to admit the

daughters of Missionaries who have failed to pass the entrance examination.

- 13. Admission to the Schools.—(1.) Free Admission. Not later than the 1st of March, the name and age of every applicant for admission shall be sent, in the case of boys, to the Rev. John S. Simon, Springfield Villa, Cobham Road, Bristol; and, in the case of girls, to the Rev. David C. Ingram, 4, Church Street, Southport: the boys must not be less than ten, and girls not less than twelve, years of age at the next Midsummer. The Examination of Candidates for entrance at the School shall be regulated on the following principle: boys of ten years of age shall pass an examination equivalent to a pass in Standard IV.; those of eleven years of age in Standard VI.
- (2.) Admission to the Schools on Payment. The number of boys for whom free provision has been made is 250. Boys so admitted may thereafter remain five years on the foundation. Parents whose boys are thus received will be entitled, for that year, to the usual allowances of six guineas from the Children's Fund and twelve pounds for Education. In addition to these, fifty boys are received annually on payment, for the first year, of £25. In every case where an extra year, at the end, is granted to any boy or girl, the sum of £30 shall be paid. Rule as to extra years shall be construed in harmony with Clause thirty-two of the Scheme of Management. Parents whose children are granted an extra year are entitled to the six gaineas from the Children's Fund, and, unless they have already received for six years, the twelve pounds for Education. All payments for children at the Schools, whether £25 for first year or £30 for extra year, are due in four equal instalments, one on each quarter day; and the money must be sent to the REV. JOHN HARVARD, Manchester Road, Bolton.
- 14. EDUCATIONAL ALLOWANCES FOR CHILDREN NOT AT THE SCHOOLS. Payments are made at the Conference for the past year; and in every case in which the Educational Allowance has been received by the parent, the claim upon the Schools' Fund

shall be understood to have been met and satisfied for that year. Claimants must be nine years of age on or before the previous Christmas-day.

- 15. CIRCUIT SCHEDULES.—Not later than the 1st of March, each Superintendent shall send to the Rev. Marshall Hartley, Elland, Normanton, a particular account of all claims for Educational Allowances in his Circuit, specifying distinctly the names of the children for whose education the claims are made, together with the date, year, and place of their birth, and the exact number of years during which the allowance has been received.
- 16. The Conference directs that the Meetings of the General Committee be held ordinarily in London, and that the first meeting be held early in October.
- 17. The thanks of the Conference are presented to the Officers of the Schools Fund, the General Committee, the Governing Bodies, with their Treasurers and Secretaries, and to the Executive Committees, for the diligent and faithful discharge of the duties of their respective offices during the year; also to Mr. John Blackburn, of Horsforth, for his valuable services as Auditor of New Kingswood and Woodhouse Grove School Accounts.
- 18. The thanks of the Conference are presented to the Rev. John H. Lord and the Rev. George Fletcher, the Governors of the School for Boys; and to Mrs. Lord and Mrs. Fletcher, together with the Lady Principals having charge of the Schools for Girls, for their kind attention to the comfort of the Boys and Girls under their care during the past year.

MAINTENANCE.

1. The Conference directs that for this year the Circuits are to raise £7 per 100 members; but that, as heretofore, the Zetland Isles shall be exempted from this assessment, the allowances for Ministers stationed in that District being paid otherwise than from the Children's Fund; and that for this year the Cornwall

District shail be relieved of one-fourth, and the Isle of Man District of 15 per cent., of their respective assessments.

- 2. TRANSFER OF MINISTERS FROM THE CHANNEL ISLANDS TO THE FRENCH CONFERENCE:—The Conference directs,
- (1.) That the following Ministers and Laymen shall be a Committee to revise the rule of 1876, and to define the relation of the children,—transferred from the French Conference to the Channel Islands District,—to the Schools' Fund and to the Children's Fund; viz.: the Officers of the Schools' Fund, Children's Fund, the Wesleyan Missionary Society, the Home Mission Fund, and the Auxiliary Society, together with the President of the French Conference, and the Chairman of the Channel Islands. The Rev. J. R. Hargreaves is appointed Convener.
- (2.) Travelling Expenses. The Conference directs that in every case of the exchange of a Minister between the French Conference and the Channel Islands, the Contingent Fund shall pay a sum towards the cost of the exchange equal to the sum paid by the Circuit of the Channel Islands benefiting by such exchange, and that the same rule shall apply to supplies duly authorized.
- 3. The thanks of the Conference are presented to the District Treasurers of the Children's Fund for their valuable services during the year; and also to the Rev. G. Stringer Rowe and Mr. William Mewburn, the General Treasurers, and to the Rev. James D. Tetley, the General Secretary.
- 4. The Rev. G. Stringer Rowe and Mr. William Mewburn are re-appointed the General Treasurers, and the Rev. J. D. Tetley the General Secretary, for the ensuing year.

HOME-MISSION AND CONTINGENT FUND.

- Q. XXIV. What are the Resolutions of the Conference in reference to the HOME-MISSION AND CONTINGENT FUND?
- A. 1. The Conference receives and adopts the Report of the Committee, and of the Army and Navy Sub-Committee; and directs that the Returns from the Army and Navy and Reserve Forces be printed in the Minutes. (See Appendix, No. IV.)
- 2. The Home-Mission Committee has authority, in concert with the Superintendent of the Circuit, to employ—in addition to District Missionaries—Ministers and Lay Agents for general evangelistic work in different parts of the Connexion; the arrangements for the employment of such Evangelistic Agents to be left for the present with the Home-Mission Committee.
- 3. Whenever the Conference has determined, after considering any recommendation of the District Committee and of the Home-Mission Committee, to withdraw a Home-Missionary Minister, and yet deems it desirable that the work be continued by means of a Lay Agent, the Home-Mission Committee shall have authority to make a grant towards the support of such Lay Agent, the grant being paid to the Circuit through the Superintendent Minister.
- 4. The Home-Mission Committee is empowered to make Grants to Circuits on the special recommendation of the District Committees, or District Home-Mission Sub-Committees, towards the support of Lay Agents—for a few years—to labour in places that are likely to take an additional Minister, and give the usual pledge, and ultimately become self-supporting; but that in all such cases a statement of the income and expenditure of the Mission, and a special report of the work, shall be annually given to the Committee.
- 5. (1.) The following Grants are to be paid to the Districts for the ensuing year, and the manner in which they have been distributed to the several Circuits shall be reported in the Minutes of the next Conference:—

DISTRICT SUSTENTATION FUNDS.

The Conference receives the Report of these Funds, and directs that the following Abstract be printed in the Minutes:

THE District Sustentation Fund has completed the ninth year of its existence. During the nine years Subscriptions to the Fund have been raised to the amount of £22,723 19s., and Grants have been made to Districts to the amount of £22,550 7s. The sum of £18,057 12s. has been raised in the aided Districts to meet Grants. The total amount paid to the several Districts in augmentation of the allowances made to Ministers since the establishment of the Fund is £40,607 19s.

The amount raised for the Fund during the past year is £2,560, and the amount granted to Districts is £1,578 5s.

Sustentation Fund Committees are now in operation in twenty-seven of the thirty-five Districts; the Fund having accomplished the end for which it was established. In some of the Districts it has ceased to exist. There are now only two hundred and eleven Circuits paying less than the minimum proposed by the Fund.

WORN-OUT MINISTERS' AND MINISTERS' WIDOWS' AUXILIARY FUND.

- Q. XXV. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the affairs of the AUXILIABY FUND?

- 8. The Conference directs that the following resolutions previously adopted shall be reprinted:—
- (1.) The Conference resolves that wherever it is practicable two Collections shall be made annually in each Chapel throughout the Connexion on behalf of the Funds of the Theological Institution, and that these Collections shall be made, if possible, on some Sunday in December.
- (2.) The Conference affirms the principle, which has from the beginning been recognised in the administration of the Institution, in regard to charges on account of Students, that such Students as have the means, or whose friends have the means, shall be expected to contribute, in whole or in part, according to their ability, towards the cost of their maintenance and education, and directs the Committee to consider and adopt such methods as may be deemed best for carrying this rule into effect.
- 9. The Conference appoints the following a sub-Committee to arrange, during the year, for initiating a system for holding meetings of the Trustees of the property occupied by the several Branches of the Institution: viz., The Secretary of the Conference, the General Treasurers, the General Secretary, the Revs. Dr. Osborn, J. E. Clapham, Messrs. H. J. Atkinson, T. P. Bunting, J. Cooper, and T. W. Pocock.
- 10. The Conference directs that the keys of the safe containing the deeds of the said property shall, subject to the approval of the said Trustees, be kept one by the General Secretary, and the other by one of the General Treasurers.
- 11. The Conference appoints the Rev. Walford Green, Mr. A. M'Arthur, M.P., Mr. George H. Chubb, and Mr. John Brewer, trustees under the Investment Trust deed.
 - 12. The Conference directs that the Quarterly Meetings of

the General Committee shall be held in Birmingham, Manchester, Leeds, and London successively.

- 13. The Conference adopts the following Resolutions on the constitution and powers of the Discipline Committees of the several Branches of the Institution:—
- (1.) That inasmuch as from the beginning of the Institution the custom has been to refer to the Discipline Committee of the Branch, consisting of Ministers only, all questions affecting the moral conduct, theological soundness, or general behaviour of the Students, and that the Discipline Committee has reported to the Conference; but that in cases where the action of the Discipline Committee affected the residence of a Student, the custom has been to inform the Executive Committee of such action, the Conference directs:—That no alteration be made in these customs, and that they be uniformly followed in all the Branches.
- (2.) The Conference directs that the practice which prevails at some Branches shall be adopted at all, viz.: That in accepting the report of the Discipline Committee in regard to the reception as full Students of those who have been three months on probation, the vote of the Executive Committee shall be taken in each case separately.
- (3.) The Conference shall appoint from year to year for each Branch of the Institution, ten Ministers who, in addition to the House Governor, Tutors, and Secretary of such Branch, shall constitute the Discipline Committee; that a list of Ministers so appointed shall be forwarded to the Nomination Committee, and that the General Secretaries of the Missionary Society shall be ex-officio members of the Discipline Committee of the Richmond Branch.
- (4.) The Conference resolves that no Student whom the Discipline Committee has dismissed from the Institution, shall be considered eligible for Ministerial employment until the Conference has decided upon his case.
 - 14. The Conference appoints the following Discipline Comittees:—

The Conference appoints a Finance Sub-Committee and directs it to meet before each Quarterly Meeting of the General Committee, to consider the reports of the Governors as to payments to and payments by Students, to examine the quarterly statements of the Local Treasurers, and generally to compare and watch the expenditure at the several Branches of the Institution.

This Committee shall consist of the General and Local Treasurers, the General and Local Secretaries, the House Governors, the Rev. Thomas Akroyd, Dr. James, George W. Olver, Henry W. Holland, Dr. Rigg, J. Bush, Messrs, T. P. Bunting, H. Edmunds, A. Pointon, J. Fishwick Stead, with the Rev. J. Ernest Clapham, Convener.

16. The Conference refers to the General Committee of the Theological Institution, in conjunction with the Committee of the Wesleyan Missionary Society, the question of continuing the separate training of Students designated for Home and

Foreign work respectively, together with certain other questions

arising therefrom.

17. The President is authorized to sanction, on behalf of the Conference, the sale of a portion of the Headingley College Estate, estimated at about one hundred square yards, provided such sale shall be first approved by the Trustees and Executive Committee of the Headingley Branch and the General Committee.

EDUCATION.

- Q. XXVII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of Wesleyan Education?
- A. 1. The Conference receives the Report of the proceedings of the Education Committee during the year, together with a Statistical Statement relating to Training Colleges, Day Schools, Sunday-Schools, and the Connexional Sunday-School Union, and directs that an Abstract thereof be printed in the Minutes as an Appendix. (See Appendix, No. II.)
- 2. The Conference directs that the following Resolutions, previously adopted, shall be reprinted:—
- (1.) The Conference empowers the Education Committee to make Grants, on inspection, to new Schools to which the provisions of the Minute of the Education Department, dated June 21st, 1878, apply, and for the probationary period during which, under the said Minute, such Schools cannot receive Grants in aid from the Department.
- (2.) The Conference expresses its opinion that, in view of the working of existing arrangements for Public Elementary Education, it is highly desirable that the number of Wesleyan Day Schools should at least be maintained. The Conference therefore strongly recommends that before any steps are taken towards the closing or transfer of any Wesleyan Day School the proposal to close or transfer it be communicated to the Education Committee, in order that they may have an oppor-

tunity of suggesting alternative proposals for the consideration of Local Managers.

- (3.) The Conference directs that in all ordinary cases of Day Schools conducted on Wesleyan Trust premises, no such Schools shall be discontinued so long as there is a reasonable prospect of their being carried on without serious embarrass-The same general principle shall apply to Wesleyan Day Schools conducted in premises rented for the purpose under the management of a recognised Wesleyan School Committee. When, however, the discontinuance of a Day School is proposed, before such proposal is carried into effect the Superintendent shall consult the Trustees, the Managing Committee, and the Subscribers; and if in any case there is a considerable division of opinion, the case shall be submitted to the Quarterly Meeting of the Circuit. In all cases, the general principle laid down by the Conference respecting the Transfer of Schools -viz., that the Superintendents of the Circuits, with the Managers and Trustees acting in concert, shall consult the Education Committee—shall be adhered to.
- (4.) The Conference declares that it shall not be deemed to be within the power and option of a Superintendent to prevent the establishment or continuance of a Wesleyan Day School, so long as responsible parties pledge themselves to bear all the financial cost and risk.
- (5.) (i.) In view of the interpretation which is put upon Section XXIII. of the Elementary Education Act by the Lords of the Committee of Council, to the effect that any transfer of a School, settled upon our School Model Deed No. I., to a School Board, for any term whatever, for the purposes of such School Board, must be sanctioned not only by the signatures of the Trustees, but by the Conference, testified by the President in writing, the Conference directs that in every case in which the transfer of such a School is proposed, the Superintendent with the Managers and Trustees acting in concert, shall first consult the Education Committee on the subject, and that if, for reasons given, that Committee recommends such a transfer,

the Rules of the Conference in relation to the sale of Trust Property shall be applicable thereto;—the Education Committee considering all questions affecting School management, and the Chapel Committee questions affecting Trust Property.

- (ii.) In respect to Schools settled on the School Model Deed No. II., or on any other Deed in which the consent of the Conference is rendered necessary for the alienation of the property, the Conference recommends the Trustees to act upon the same principles as those laid down in the foregoing clause in relation to Schools settled on the School Model Deed No. I.
- (iii.) In all cases of transfer which may hereafter occur, the Conference recommends that provision be made in the instrument of transfer to secure the resumption of the premises by the Trustees, without their being required to reimburse any money laid out upon them by the School Board solely for its own purposes.
- (6.) The Conference directs that the Statistics of the Day and Sunday-Schools of each Circuit be read in the March Quarterly Meeting; but that if sufficient time be not then available for the discussion of the Statistics, and for inquiry into the state of the Schools, such discussion and enquiry shall take place in the June Quarterly Meeting.
- (7.) The Conference directs that the Education Schedules, having been duly filled up and presented to the March Quarterly Meeting, shall be sent by the Superintendents to the District Education Secretary, not later than April 20th, in each year.
- (8.) The Conference directs all who are contemplating the erection or alteration of premises for the establishment of new Schools, to communicate with the Education Committee, for the purpose of receiving counsel as to their projected undertakings, and the adaptation of the premises to the system of instruction designed to be adopted.
- (9.) The Conference directs that the October Examination of Pupil Teachers in Religious Knowledge shall be held on the last

Saturday of that month. The March Examination will continue to be held on the *first* Saturday of that month.

- (10.) The Conference authorizes the observance of the third Sunday in October in each year as a day for Special Prayer on behalf of Sunday-schools and young people.
- 3. The Conference directs that the District Sunday-School Sub-Committees shall have charge also of the interests of the Day-schools in their respective Districts.
- 4. The thanks of the Conference are presented to the Rev. FREDERIC GREEVES, D.D., to MR. FREDERICK HOWARD, and to MR. WILLIAM VANNER, for their services as Treasurers of the Education Fund.
- 5. The Conference re-appoints the REV. FREDERIC GREEVES, D.D., MR. FREDERICK HOWARD, and MR. WILLIAM VANNER, to be Treasurers of the Education Fund. The special duty of Mr. William Vanner shall be the charge of the Sunday-School Union branch of the finance.
- 6. The EDUCATION COMMITTEE shall consist of the following persons, namely,—

EXTENSION OF METHODISM IN GREAT BRITAIN.

- Q. XXX. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of the Fund for the Extension of Methodism in Great Britain?
- A. 1. The Conference adopts the Report, which shows that during the past year the Committee have received and considered 106 applications and have made 83 grants, amounting to upwards of £9,000. Additional sittings provided during the year, 12,731. Subscriptions, etc., during the year have amounted to £3,346 19s. 3d. Since the formation of the Fund there have been—Applications for aid, 883; Grants made 649, amounting to £42,190 11s. 9d.; Additional sittings provided, 102,607. The total amount promised was £47,470, exclusive of the £45,000 granted by the Thanksgiving Fund. Subscriptions, etc., received amount to £32,195 5s. 8d.

TEMPERANCE.

- Q. XXXI. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of TEMPERANCE?
- A. 1. The Conference receives and adopts the Report of the Temperance Committee, and directs that an Abstract of the Report be printed in the Minutes. (See Appendix, No. VIII.)
- 2. The Conference hears with great satisfaction of the unprecedented growth of the Temperance organizations of Methodism, as shown by the fact that there are now in Great Britain 2,644 Wesleyan-Methodist Bands of Hope, with 271,700 members, and 321 Wesleyan-Methodist Temperance Societies, with 28,414 members. In order to secure permanence in these large results, the Conference would urge upon all Methodist Temperance advocates the importance of giving due prominence to Scriptural and Scientific instruction.
- 3. The Conference rejoices to learn that the Wesleyan Methodist Petition for the Sunday closing of public-houses in England contained 596,877 signatures. The Conference presents its thanks to all who have specially promoted the success of this great undertaking, which has so decisively exhibited the practical unanimity of Wesleyan Methodism in relation to the Sunday liquor traffic. The Conference instructs the Temperance Committee to lose no opportunity during the next year of in-

fluencing Parliament to pass the Bill, and cannot but express its deep regret that Parliament should allow session after session to close without conferring upon the people of England a boon which would so promptly and greatly promote their social and religious welfare.

- 4. The Conference recommends that on the second Sunday in December in each year special reference shall be made in all Wesleyan-Methodist places of worship, and in all Wesleyan Sunday-schools, to the appalling extent and dire results of Intemperance in Great Britain.
- 5. In order to complete the Temperance organization already sanctioned, and to meet a felt want, the Conference adopts the following regulations for the appointment of District Temperance sub-Committees:—
- (1.) Each September District Meeting shall appoint a District Temperance sub-Committee, consisting of the Chairman of the District, the District Temperance Secretary, who shall be Secretary of the sub-Committee, four other ministers, and six laymen, who shall not thereby become ex-officio members of the District Committee.
- (2.) The Temperance sub-Committee shall prepare the Annual Report on the Temperance work in the District, and shall attend generally to the Temperance affairs of the District.
- (3.) No arrangements shall be made by the District Temperance sub-Committee, on behalf of Temperance Societies or Bands of Hope in any Circuit, without the consent of the Superintendent of that Circuit.
 - 6. The Committee for the ensuing year shall consist of,-
- (1.) Ex-officio members,—namely, the President and the Secretary of the Conference; the ex-President; the Secretaries and Lay Treasurer of the Committee; the Book-Steward; the Connexional Editor; the Secretary of the Connexional Sunday-School Union; one of the Secretaries of the Lord's Day Observance Committee; and,—

(2.) The following Ministers and Laymen, namely,—

WESLEYAN-METHODIST THANKSGIVING FUND.

I. The Conference receives the Report of the Executive Committee, and directs that it be printed in the Minutes. (See Appendix, No. IX.)

II. The Conference expresses its gratification and thankfulness in view of the favourable statement which has been presented to it respecting the Fund, and directs the Executive Committee to prepare a final Balance-Sheet, and Report with all convenient despatch.

III. The Conference directs that, after all other claims upon the Fund are met, any balance remaining shall be divided *pro ratâ* between the three Funds to which grants were made by Resolution III. of the Conference of 1880 (Min. Conf., p. 246).

IV. Inasmuch as it has not yet been practicable to prepare a final Balance-Sheet, the Conference resolves that the Executive Committee of the Fund, together with Ministers and Laymen to act as its Officers, shall be re-appointed as follows:—

Q. XXXII. What OTHER RESOLUTIONS are adopted by the Conference in its REPRESENTATIVE SESSION?

- 1. The Rev. T. Tapley Short is directed to prepare the volume of Agenda for the Conference of 1884.
- 2. The Rev. Charles H. Kelly and Mr. William Vanner are appointed Secretaries of the Nomination Committee, and are directed to prepare and print lists of the persons recommended by the Committee for service on the several Connexional Committees, and to furnish a copy to each member of the Conference on the first day of the Representative Session.
- 3. Mr. Henry B. Harrison is appointed Convener of the Scrutineers of votes for the election of Lay Representatives by the Conference.
- 4. The thanks of the Conference are presented to the Rev. J. Ernest Clapham, the Convenor of the Committee on Connexional and Circuit Finance, for his invaluable services in the preparation of the business of the Committee. The thanks of the Conference are also presented to the Rev. T. Tapley Short for the great assistance rendered by him to the Committee.

DIVISION OF CIRCUITS.—The Reports of the several District Committees on the proposed Scheme for the alteration, amalgamation, or division of Circuits were presented. The Conference does not at present confirm the Scheme, but reserves it for further consideration.

METHODISM IN SOUTH WALES.—The Conference adopts the following Scheme:—

- 1. That a Fund be formed for the Extension of Methodism in South Wales and Monmouthshire, to be called 'The South Wales and Monmouthshire Wesleyan Methodist Extension Fund,' and to be administered in two sections.
- Section A. Grants towards the employment of Lay Agents, and of Ministers, when the appointment of a Minister shall be deemed advisable.
- Section B. Grants towards Chapels, Mission Rooms, etc. These grants shall be so distributed that, where both English and Welsh interests exist in the same locality, help shall only be given where the Societies aided are so worked as to be in harmony with each other and render each other mutual support.
- 2. That meetings be arranged for at Cardiff, Swansea, and several other centres, for the purpose of forming a South Wales Wesleyan-Methodist Extension Fund,
- 3. That application be made to the Home Mission, Extension of Methodism, and Chapel Funds, for special help during the next five years, as follows:—
- Section A. For £100 per annum from the Home-Mission Fund, and the same amount from the Extension Fund.
- Section B. For £500 a year from the Extension Fund, and £250 a year from the Chapel Fund.
- 4. That, in the opinion of this meeting, it is most desirable that full information upon Chapel and Home-Mission movements in the Bristol, Swansea, and South Wales Districts (where the interests of this Fund are affected) be supplied, from time to time, to the South Wales Extension Fund Committee, and that this Committee be directed to report its proceedings annually to the Bristol, Swansea, and South Wales District Committees.

The following Committee is appointed to watch the interests of Methodism in South Wales, and to report to the next Con
**rence:—The Chairman of the Bristol, Swansea, and South

Wales Districts, with two Ministers and three Laymen from the Bristol and Swansea Districts, and three Ministers and four Laymen from the South Wales District who shall be elected by the several Financial District Meetings, together with the Rev. Dr. Rigg, Samuel Davies, John W. Greeves, Lancelot Railton, Henry J. Pope, and John A. B. Harry, Convener.

MARRIAGE LAW AMENDMENT.—The Conference adopts the principles of the following Scheme for dispensing with the attendance of Registrars at Marriages celebrated in Weslevan chapels, and directs the Sub-Committee of Privileges to support by memorial or otherwise any Bill which may be brought before Parliament embodying these principles:-Notice must be given at the office of the Registrar, as at present. Fourteen days after such notice the Registrar shall issue a Certificate, or three days after such notice a License, on the production of which any Minister duly authorized for that purpose may celebrate the Marriage, in any duly Registered place of worship within a reasonable time, to be fixed by Law. Duplicate forms of a Certificate, to be furnished by the Registrar, shall be signed immediately after the marriage by the Minister, the newlymarried persons, and two witnesses. One copy of the said Certificate shall be forwarded to the Registrar by the Minister performing the ceremony, either personally or by post, in an envelope provided by the Registrar; the penalty for not so returning it to be fixed by law. The other copy shall be retained by the Minister. The Registrar having received the Certificate of the performance of the Marriage, may at any time afterwards issue a certified copy of the entry in the Register. The total fees charged at the Registrar's office, should not be greater than the fees charged for an ordinary Marriage, according to the rites of the Church of England.

AUDIT OF CONNEXIONAL FUNDS. — The Conference directs that the accounts of all Connexional Funds shall be regularly audited by professional accountants, who shall certify the correctness of such accounts in the annual balance-sheets.

Assessment for the Children's and Schools' Funds.—
The Conference directs:—

- 1. That in the future the mode of assessment on the Districts shall be at varying rates per Minister, and that such rates shall be determined by the number of Members in Society and financial ability,—other conditions such as grants made from the Home Mission and Contingent Fund to Districts on account of Circuits which are not self-supporting, etc., being taken into consideration.
- 2. That in estimating the financial ability of a District, the following shall be taken into account, viz.:—Circuit Income, Stat Rents, Ordinary Contributions to our Funds, with Sunday-school Income.
- N.B.—Circuit Income shall be understood to include all sums administered by the Circuit Stewards, however raised; where Ministers' houses are Circuit property, a fair rental for such house shall be included; in considering the amount of Seat Rents, the interest paid on debts on Trust Estates shall be taken into account.
- 3. That the District Meetings shall arrange the incidence of the assessment on the Circuits, in accordance with the provisions contained in Resolutions 1 and 2, and that the Committee to be appointed by the Conference shall prepare a provisional scheme for the use of the District Committees.
- 4. That all estimates of expenditure shall be made for periods of five years, and that any assessment made by the Conference shall remain in force for a period of five years, but that the assessment made at the Conference of 1884, if necessary, shall be revised by the Conference of 1885.
- 5. That at the Conference prior to that at which each five yearly period begins, a representative Committee shall be appointed to prepare a scheme graduating the incidence of the assessment to be made upon the Districts for the ensuing period.
- 6. That such representative Committee shall consist of the President and the Secretary of the Conference, the ex-President, the Officers of the Home-Mission, Schools', and Children's Funds.

one minister and one layman to be elected by each District at the Financial District Meetings in September, with twelve ministers and as many laymen as will equalize the number of ministers and laymen to be appointed by the Conference.

- 7. That a regular balance-sheet of the Children's Fund, showing total Income and Expenditure in detail, shall be printed in the Report of the two Funds.
- 8. That after 1884 the Departments shall pay on account of each Minister employed by them the average cost per minister of the Children's and Schools' Fund, to the Connexion.
- 9. That the Children's and the Schools' Funds shall be amalgamated, but that the amalgamation shall not be carried into effect until the beginning of the next five yearly period.
- 10. That for the next five yearly period the Subscriptions of the Ministers to the Schools' Fund shall be continued, and that the balance of the deficiency shall be raised by assessment on the same basis as the Children's Fund.
- 11. That the Scheme of assessment at varying rates per minister presented to the Conference shall be referred to the Committee on Connexional and Circuit Finance.

METHODISM IN THE CITY OF LONDON.—The Conference receives the Report and appoints the following Committee to consider the whole subject of Methodism in the City of London, and the best means of making suitable provision for it, and to report to the next Conference, viz.: The President and Secretary of the Conference, the Rev. OLDHAM-STREET CHAPEL, MANCHESTER.—1. The Report of the Committee was read and adopted.

- 2. The following are appointed a Committee to confer with the Trustees of the Oldham-Street property as to all matters affecting the property, and to consent, on the application of the Trustees, if the Committee shall so think proper, to the sale of whole or any part of the property, viz.:—Rev. Joseph Bush, Dr. Greeves, John Harvard, George W. Olver, Joseph C. Woodcock, with Messrs. Henry J. Atkinson, John Cooper, John Dyson, Isaac Hoyle, and T. Walton Strad. The Rev. Joseph C. Woodcock is appointed Convener.
- 3. At the request of the Committee, the President is authorized to affix his signature to any consent of sale, or application to the Charity Commissioners.

CUSTODY OF CONNEXIONAL DOCUMENTS.—The Conference receives the Report of the Committee on the Custody of Connexional Documents, and re-appoints that Committee, repeating its instructions of last year. (See Minutes, 1882, p. 287). The Committee shall consist of the President and Secretary of the Conference, the Rev. Dr. Osborn, Dr. Rigg, Marmaduke C. Osborn, Theophilus Woolmer, Dr. Greeves, David J. Waller, and J. Ernest Clapham, with Messrs. John W. Gabriel, T. M. Harvey, William Johnson, and W. Willmer Pocock. Dr. Williams is re-appointed Custodian and Registrar and also Convener of the Committee.

NECESSITOUS LOCAL PREACHERS.—The Conference adopts the Report of the Committee, and approves the insertion of the following clause in the Trust Deed:—'The Trustees may from time to time accept any further sums which may be given or bequeathed for the purposes aforesaid, and shall hold the same upon any special Trusts and subject to any special conditions or directions which may be declared or imposed by the respective donors or testators, and subject thereto upon the same

trusts as are herein declared with respect to the said sum of eight thousand pounds.'

The Conference directs the Trustees of the Necessitous Local Preachers' Fund to pay to the Committee the available income of the current year, to be administered by the Committee in accordance with the Scheme adopted by the Conference.

The Conference appoints the following Committee, with power to appoint a small Executive Committee:—Rev. Alexander M'Aulay, George O. Bate, John Jackson (A), George Kenyon, Samuel Lees, David J. Waller, Dr. Williams; Messrs. Henry Avis, John Beauchamp, Abraham J. Brook, Thomas Cole, John Dyson, George Lidgett, George Parkinson, William J. Pile, W. Willmer Pocock, Major Smith, H. Arthur Smith, and Samuel D. Waddy, Q.C.

Mr. John Beauchamp is appointed Treasurer, and the Rev. John Jackson (A) Secretary.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES ACTS.—1. The Conference receives the Report of the Wesleyan Methodist Society for Abolishing the Regulation of Vice by the State, and renews its solemn protest against the Contagious Diseases Acts as being iniquitous in principle and demoralizing in tendency.

- 2. The Conference thankfully rejoices at the signal success won in the House of Commons, and trusts that this success will be speedily followed by the complete abolition of the system of regulating vice by public authority, and that in future the action both of our Government and of Municipal Authorities on this subject will be based upon the principles of the Word of God.
- The undermentioned ministers and gentlemen are appointed a Committee to consider whether it is expedient that any specially

The smaller Committee shall consist of the President and Secretary of the Conference, the ex-President, one Minister and one Layman from each of the following Departments: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, Auxiliary Fund, Chapel Fund, Schools' Fund, Children's Fund, Metropolitan Chapel Building Fund, Education, Theological Institution, Extension of Methodism, Sunday-School Union, and Children's Home; Rev. G. O. Bate, George Bowden, George Dickenson, Walford Green, Dr. Greeves, John S. Jones, Alexander M'Aulay, George W. Olver, Dr. Osborn, Dr. Rigg, T. Tapley Short, Joseph C. Woodcock; Messrs. Henry J. Atkinson, John Beauchamp, George W. Booth, T. P. Bunting, John Cooper, T. M. Harvey, W. B. Horner, J. Wesley Lewis, Thomas G. Osborn, W. W. Pocock, J. Rivett, T. Walton Stead.

The larger Committee shall consist of the above, with all officers of the Departments named, one Minister and one Layman to be chosen by each September District Meeting in Great Britain, and the following Laymen, in order to equalize the number of Ministers and Laymen:—Messrs. R. B. Brierley, John Dingley, Henry Edmunds, Thomas Dewhirst, George Lidgett, Henry R. Bowers, William Mewburn, jun., Thomas B. Holmes, Lewis Williams, and John Holden.

The Rev. J. Ernest Clapham is Convener of both Committees,

The following questions are referred to these Committees:-

- 1. The preparation of the detailed Scheme of the Assessment for the Children's Fund on Districts and Circuits.
- 2. The proposal that, while separate administration and accounts for each Fund shall be maintained, a central Financial Office and common cash for all Connexional Funds shall be established.
- 3. The practicability of the earlier closing of the accounts of the several Connexional Funds, in order that the balance-sheets may be presented to the Conference.
- 4. The best means of securing that all cheques drawn on account of Connexional Funds shall be signed by more than one person.

The Convener is directed to collect for the use of the Committees all necessary information from the Districts and the Circuits.

ACCOUNTS OF CONNEXIONAL FUNDS.—The Conference appoints a Committee to ascertain the methods employed in the transaction of the Financial business, the keeping of the accounts, and the conduct of the annual audits of the several Connexional Funds, with power to call for any books, documents, or information which it may need. It shall at its discretion offer any suggestions to the several Committees having charge of the Funds, and shall report to the next Conference. The following is the Committee: The Rev. Dr. Greeves, Walford Green, Theophilus Woolmer, J. Ernest Clapham; with Messrs. T. C. Squance, T. M. Harvey, T. W. Pocock, and Henry J. Atkinson. The Rev. George W. Olver is Convener.

ENGLISH PREACHING IN NORTH WALES.—The Conference appoints the following Committee: Five persons to be elected by the North Wales District, and four by the Liverpool District at the Financial District Meetings in September, with two to be appointed by the Home-Mission Committee, who shall consider, as they arise, the openings for English preaching in North Wales, and shall make provision for them, with due regard to existing interests. The Rev. John W. Greeves is Convener.

APPLICATIONS FROM NEW SOUTH WALES, QUEENSLAND, AND SOUTH AUSTRALIA. — The Conference in its Representative Session concurs in the Resolution of the Conference in its Pastoral Session, relating to the consent of the Conference to give some of the Students who have been trained at the Theological Institution the option of joining the Conferences of New South Wales and Queensland, and South Australia, and agrees to remit to these Conferences two-thirds of the cost of the maintenance and training of such students.

ECUMENICAL METHODIST CONFERENCE.—The Report of the proceedings of the First Œcumenical Methodist Conference was presented, containing the following suggestions and resolutions:—

- 1. That it is expedient that a Second Œcumenical Conference be assembled, and, if practicable, in the United States, in the year 1887.
- 2. That in order thereto, and for the promotion of Christian fraternity, the several Methodist bodies are earnestly desired to create an Executive Committee as now constituted, subject to such changes in its Membership as they in their wisdom may ordain, beginning with the British Wesleyan Conference in the year 1883.
- 3. That the Executive Committee, constituted in accordance with these resolutions, shall determine the time and place of holding the Second Œcumenical Conference, the number of Delegates to be chosen, and the ratio of their distribution amongst the respective Methodist bodies, shall prepare a programme of exercises and rules and regulations for the government of the Conference, and shall make all other necessary arrangements.

The Conference resolves:-

- 1. That a Committee be appointed to consider the expediency of holding a Second Œcumenical Methodist Conference in 1887, in the United States or elsewhere.
- 2. That the Committee shall have power to invite to its deliberations, if it thinks fit, representative men from the other

Methodist bodies in this country that took part in the last Œcumenical Conference.

- 3. That if the Committee agree as to the expediency of the proposed Œcumenical Conference, it shall take such preliminary steps towards it as it deems wise, with a view to such united action as shall be found needful, including the instruction of the Representatives of this Conference to the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States as to any enquiries or suggestions it may be desirable that they should make.
- 4. That the Committee shall report its proceedings to the next Conference to be held in Burslem in 1884.

V.

STANDING ORDERS.

- 1. Names and Addresses of Circuit Stewards.—The Superintendents of Circuits are required to furnish the Chairman of the District with the names and addresses of the Circuit Stewards immediately after the December Quarterly Meeting; and, immediately after the March Quarterly Meeting, with the name and address of any gentleman elected to attend the May District Meeting in the place of any Circuit Steward declaring his inability to attend such District Meeting.
- 2. Admission of Members.—Mistakes having occasionally arisen respecting the meaning of the Rule of 1797 on the subject of the admission of persons who are on trial as Members of our Society, the Conference deems it necessary to repeat the statement, That it never was intended that the names of all those who are on trial should be laid before a Leaders' Meeting for distinct and formal discussion; but solely, that if there be, in the opinion of a Leader, any reasonable objection to the character and conduct of any person who is on trial, such objection may be stated by him; and that, if the validity of the objection be established to the satisfaction of the Meeting, a Member's Ticket shall not be given to the person so objected to, at the Quarterly Visitation.
- 3. Trial of Members.—When a charge is brought against any Member resident in a place where no Leaders' Meeting is statedly held, the case shall be referred for investigation to the Leaders' Meeting of the principal Society in the Circuit Town. The Leader or Leaders, and the Society Stewards, of the Society of which the accused is a Member, shall be associated with the Leaders' Meeting for the purposes of the investigation.

If the accused person is a *Trustee*, then there shall also be associated with the Leaders' Meeting, as above constituted, the Trustees of the Chapel with which the Society of which he is a

Member is connected; or, if there is no such Chapel, then the Trustees of the Chapel in connection with the principal Society in the Circuit Town. But no Trustee shall, in either case, be so associated, unless he is himself a Member of Society in the same Circuit.

- 4. Attendance of Ministers at Official Meetings.—Mistakes having arisen on this subject, the Conference deems it proper and necessary to declare, that all the Ministers and Preachers on Trial appointed to a Circuit have a constitutional right to-take part as members in our Leaders' Meetings, and in all other official meetings of the Circuits to which they are appointed.
- 5. Probationers and the Lord's Supper.—The Conference, having been informed that, in several Circuits, the Preachers on Trial have very rarely an opportunity of receiving the Lord's Supper, resolves that, in compliance with a former injunction on this subject, the Superintendents be required to make the necessary arrangements, in their Circuit-Plans, for securing to their junior Colleagues proper facilities for partaking of this Holy Sacrament.
- 6. Liverpool Minutes.—The Resolutions adopted by the Conference in the year 1820, and usually called the 'Liverpool Minutes,' besides being read and considered in the Annual Meeting of each District Committee, (as our Standing Regulations require,) shall also be read at the Weekly Meeting of Ministers in each Circuit, next following the September Quarterly Meeting, or instead thereof the Resolutions on the Work of God, and on Pastoral Duties adopted in the years 1835 and 1847; and the Chairmen of Districts are directed to make enquiry concerning the due observance of this regulation.
- 7. Supply of Vacancies.—Instances having occurred in which Superintendents and other Ministers needing Circuit-supplies on occasion of sickness and various casualties, have applied to the President of the Conference, without first taking counsel with the Chairman of the District; the Conference directs the brethren to return to the old plan of first communicating with the Chairman in every such case, who is also directed to satisfy

himself, by personal enquiry, that a local supply cannot be obtained.

- 8. Reading of the Pastoral Address.—The Superintendents are directed to appoint special Society Meetings, to be held at the principal Chapels in their Circuits, for the purpose of having the Pastoral Address read, and made the subject of suitable remarks and exhortations.
- 9. Annual Return of Members.—The number of Members in the Society, and of persons admitted on trial, as taken at the March Quarterly Visitation in each year, and reported at the District Meetings, shall be the number returned on the Minutes of the following Conference.
- 10. Returns of the Military.—The Conference directs that the returns of the Military in attendance at our Chapels shall include the actual number of soldiers who are declared Wesleyan-Methodists stationed in the Circuit, and not merely the average number in attendance at Divine Service.
- 11. Examination of Pupil-Teachers.—The Conference directs that the Annual Examination of Pupil-Teachers in Religious Knowledge shall be held on the last Saturday in October and on the first Saturday in March; that the questions shall be prepared by the General Committee; that the Examination shall be held, either in the several Circuits by the Superintendent Ministers or their Colleagues, or at suitable places for Central District Examinations, as may be determined by the September District Meetings, and agreed to by the respective School Committees; and that the written answers shall be forwarded to the General Secretary, and shall be valued by a Central Board of Examiners to be elected by the General Committee. The Conference further recommends that, in connection with Central Examinations, Meetings of Teachers and Pupil-Teachers be held under the direction of the Chairman of the District and the District Educational Secretary.
- 12. Quarterly Fast-Days.—The days upon which the Quarterly Fast, appointed by Rule, is to be observed throughout the Connexion, for the following year, are, Fridays, September

28th, and December 28th, 1883, March 28th, and June 27th, 1884.

- 13. Discipline of Methodism.—The Chairmen of Districts are enjoined to make particular enquiries at their Annual Meetings in reference to all the points of Discipline specified in the first Article of the Answer to Q. XXVIII. in the Minutes of 1825.
- 14. Candidates for Admission on Trial.—(1.) Those Preachers who are recommended for Admission on Trial shall preach in the presence of at least three of the Ministers of the District Committee, (at or about the time of its Annual Meeting in May,) to be selected by the Chairman, exclusive of the Superintendents by whom the Candidates respectively are proposed; and a special report of the Sermons shall be made in the District Meeting, and immediately forwarded in writing to the Secretaries of the Committee for the Examination of Candidates.
- (2.) The Conference directs that arrangements shall be made by the May District Meetings for the hearing of each Candidate by one Minister of the District, in addition to those who have heard him before his recommendation by the District Committee, such Minister to forward his Report to the General Secretaries of the Examination Committee.
- 15. Preachers on Trial.—Whenever it shall be found to be practicable, Preachers on Trial shall preach during the District Meetings.
- 16. Candidates for Ordination.—The Conference directs that Candidates for Ordination shall, at or before the May District Meeting, preach before three Ministers of the District, who shall report to the Meeting.
- 17. Annual Returns of the Members.—The Returns of the Members in the Society are to be forwarded, immediately after the May District Meetings, to the Rev. John W. Greeves, Wesleyan Centenary Hall, Bishopsgate Street Within, London, E.C.
- 18. Returns of the Military.—The Chairmen of Districts are directed to enquire of the Superintendents of Circuits in which troops are marched to Divine service in our chapels, the average number of non-commissioned officers and men in attendance;

distinguishing the number of Members in Society. These returns must include, also, the actual number of soldiers who are declared Wesleyan-Methodists. The returns given are to be recorded in the District Minutes. If there be no military attendance in the District, a note to that effect shall be inserted.

- 19. Home-Missionary Ministers.—The Conference directs that a special enquiry shall be made at the May District Meetings, whether the Regulations for the employment of Home-Missionary Ministers, adopted by the Conference, have been faithfully observed in the Circuits to which Home-Missionary Ministers are appointed; and that a Report in each case shall be made to the Conference.
- 20. Lay-Members of District Committees.—The Chairmen of Districts shall be required to send a circular to the Lay-Members of the District Committee, requesting their attendance on the Wednesday, and, if necessary, on the Thursday, in the week of the Annual District Meeting, specifying the business that will be brought forward, and particularly mentioning any subject that may have been specially remitted by the Conference to the consideration of such Meeting. A similar circular shall be prepared and sent with reference to the Financial District Meeting.
- 21. Representative to the Stationing Committee.—The Minister who shall be the Representative of any District to the Stationing Committee shall be chosen by the united votes of the Ministers and Isaymen who are members of the District Committee.
- 22. Division of Circuits.—Before District Committees consent to the division of any Circuit, enquiry must be made whether due attention has been paid to satisfactory arrangements for the Trust-Estates affected by the proposed division, especially in reference to any debts existing thereon.
- 23. Boundaries of Circuits.—Whereas difficulties have arisen from the want of accurate and recorded definitions of the boundaries of Circuits, the Conference directs that, in future, the boundaries of Circuits which are divided shall be fully

stated in the Minutes of the District Meeting to which they belong, and that the Secretary of the District shall send a copy of the record to be inserted in the Minutes of the Quarterly Meetings of the Circuits concerned; and that, in such cases, copies of the Ordnance maps, or some other maps, of the localities concerned, be coloured so as to show the boundaries, and deposited in the safes provided for the custody of the Trust-Deeds of the Circuits. The Conference further directs that these arrangements be made in all cases of alteration in the boundaries of existing Circuits.

24. Minor District Meetings.—In all cases in which the holding of a Minor District Meeting is rendered necessary, such Meeting, except under the Regulation passed by the Conference in 1840, (Minutes, Vol. IX., p. 94,) shall be held in the District in which the accused party resides, the accused and the accuser selecting respectively two Ministers from the said District, who, with the Chairman thereof, shall constitute the Minor District Meeting.

Should either party refuse or decline to choose two Ministers, to act as members of the Meeting, the Chairman is empowered and directed to nominate them so that the number required by Rule may be made up.

25. District Minutes.—The Chairmen of Districts are required to procure three complete copies of the Minutes of the several Annual and other Meetings of the District Committees, transcribed according to the order of time in which such Meetings shall have been held, and duly signed by the Chairman and Secretary. One of these copies shall be inserted in the District Records; a second shall be reserved for the use of the Chairman and Financial Secretary at the Conference; and a third shall be sent to the Rev. David J. Waller, Wesleyan Training College, Westminster, S. W., not later than June 24th, and delivered by him to the President during the first week of each Conference, to be preserved under his direction, as a document appertaining to the Connexion. The several copies of the last class shall be written on foolscap paper, that they may be annually bound together in one volume.

26. Schedules from Departments.—As it is obviously desirable that the Committees appointed by the Conference to manage the several departments of the business of the Connexion, in the intervals of its Session, should be furnished with as much statistical information as possible on the matters of business severally confided to their care, the Conference authorises them, through their appointed Officers, to send, when they deem it expedient, suitable Circulars and Schedules to the Superintendents, or to the Chairmen of Districts, as the case may require; and directs the Superintendents and Chairmen duly to return such Schedules properly filled up.

27. Committee on Appeals and other Cases.—At each Conference, the President shall nominate, not later than the second day, a Committee of twenty-one members of the Conference, to whom shall be referred, without discussion, all cases requiring further enquiry touching the character of Ministers or Preachers on Trial, immediately after the reading of the Minutes of District Committees thereupon, or of any notice of charge or appeal relating thereto, or for any reason which the Conference may deem sufficient.

Any complainant or appellant, or any person under enquiry, may object to one in three of the members of the said Committee sitting on his case; and the President shall then appoint some other member of the Conference to act instead of the member so objected to.

Special Cases to be decided upon by the Conference may be referred to the whole Committee; but it shall, for ordinary purposes, be divided into three sections, for each of which a Convener shall be appointed, who shall be responsible for preparing the business of the Committee.

28. Lay-Members of Connexional Committees.—In respect to the several Committees of the Connexional Funds, the Conference resolves, that a certain number of Lay Gentlemen, being at least one-sixth of the number of Lay Members of each Departmental Committee, shall annually retire from each Committee by rotation, the same persons being ineligible for

immediate re-appointment, except in special cases, and after nomination for such re-appointment by the vote of four-fifths of the Members of the Committee present.

29. Preparations for the Stationing Committee.—The Representative of each District shall send to the Secretary of the Conference, not later than the 27th day of June in each year, upon a Schedule to be provided by him, complete lists of (1) the arrangements provisionally made for the Stationing of Ministers in his District, (2) the invitations accepted by Ministers in his District to Circuits in other Districts, and (3) all Ministers in his District for whom no arrangement has been made;—from these lists the Secretary of the Conference shall compile, and cause to be printed in a convenient form for use in the Stationing Committee, one complete list of all arrangements thus provisionally made, and a separate list of all Ministers for whom provisional arrangements have not been made; and a copy of these lists shall be sent to each member of the Stationing Committee at least seven days before the meeting of that Committee.

30. Conference Plan.—The Superintendents of those Circuits in which the Conference may, from year to year, assemble, shall, with the previous approbation of the President, (as already required by Rule,) complete and print, not later than the 15th day of June in each year, a Plan of the order of preaching in the principal chapels during the Session of the Conference; and shall also, on or before the above date, inform every person whom they have appointed to preach in those chapels, of the time and place of such appointment. And in order that the Plan thus prepared may not be violated, to the disappointment of our friends, and to the great inconvenience of other parties concerned, no Minister who attends the Conference shall be at liberty to make an engagement to preach in any other Circuit, either on the Sabbath, or on any other day, during the period appointed for the meeting of the Conference, at the time for which his name shall be inserted on the Conference Plan.

THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

CONFERENCE TO THE METHODIST SOCIETIES.

BELOVED BRETHREN IN CHRIST,-

Accept once more our annual greeting.

We are thankful to be able to report a net increase during the past year of 13,331 Church-members. This is the more gratifying because it follows a similar increase reported a year ago. Altogether, 60,606 new members have joined us. But 5.135 members have been removed by death; 4,277 have been lost by emigration, or by removal from place to place in Great Britain; and 27,710 have for other reasons ceased to be enrolled among us, chiefly, we fear, through declension in spiritual life, or disregard of the value of visible union with the professed servants of Christ. We are glad to report various other signs, in many places, of spiritual life and growth, and of intelligent and unwearied Christian enterprise. And we are deeply thankful for the spirit of unity and peace which throughout the year has reigned in all our Societies.

We notice with pleasure that the number of our Sunday scholars has increased, and that of these 62,294 scholars are already counted as Church-members, or as on trial for membership, and that 38,145 more are enrolled in junior Society-classes. Our Bands of Hope, which we value greatly, have also prospered; as have our Temperance Societies. This is pleasant proof that our Church has shared in the spread of temperance principles, which during the past year has been so conspicuous

in the country at large.

To the many thousands who have been recently united to us in Church-fellowship, we send our heartiest Christian greeting. By joining us, you have entered the portals, not merely of the Wesleyan Communion, but of the visible Church of Christ on earth, the universal company of His professed servants. This glorious community has continued in various sections, with various names and forms, throughout the ages of Christianity, and will continue to the end of time, and when time shall cease. And in all ages it has been the light of the world. Into its ranks you have this year been received. Henceforth it is your honour to bear aloft, by your spotless life and your humble confession, the royal banner, and to be witnesses for Christ before many who, through ignorance of Him, are in darkness and sin, and under the shadow of eternal death. Be faithful to your solemn charge.

At the present you are our first care; and to help you, as God shall give us grace, will be our highest joy. Look upon your entrance into the Christian life as not merely a point gained, but a point of departure for further progress, as an early day-dawn which, moment by moment, will brighten to the noon of heaven, or, rather, as the beginning of a growth which will develop through life and throughout eternity. Whatever you have learnt and gained is but an earnest of still greater things. Be ever eager to know more about your Father in heaven, and about the mysterious gift and sacrifice of His Son, through whom the Father has drawn near to us. And. whatever you thus learn, endeavour to work out into the practical details of life: for only thus can the truths of the Gospel be richly and permanently your own. Let it be evident to all around that the Word you have believed has changed, and is changing, your entire outer and inner life.

Similar counsel we give most earnestly to every servant of Christ, even to those who have served Him during a long course of years. Constant growth is the unfailing mark of healthy spiritual life. The highest attainments should be but the starting point to still loftier heights of intelligence and peace, and joy and power. Remember that it is our privilege to be saved now, and each moment preserved, from all sin, and to be filled, by the indwelling spirit of Christ, with unreserved and glad devotion to God. Seek therefore a keen, instinctive perception of sin and self in their many and subtle forms, and an ever increasing conviction of their essential hurtfulness, and for constant and complete victory over them; for a richer revelation

through Christ of God's infinite love to us and to all men, and for a more intelligent and comprehensive view of His purposes of mercy, and of the way of salvation. Expect to find this fuller revelation permeating and moulding and ennobling every detail of life, especially of business and domestic life. Make every commercial transaction, and every domestic arrangement, a service of Christ, and lay your every faculty as a sacrifice upon So will your various duties and surroundings His altar. become opportunities for putting to practical test the truths of the Gospel. In your own daily faithfulness you will find a constant manifestation of God's grace and power, and a proof of the truth of the Word you have believed. Every secular duty will become a means of spiritual growth. And the moral beauty of your life will be a gospel which all around will understand, and an irresistible reply to the enemies of Christianity. Such allpervasive Christian life is the greatest need now of the Church and of the world.

As an aid in this individual development, we counsel careful and prayerful and systematic study of Holy Scripture. The words of the Bible will thus become to you the purest and richest source of spiritual life. And the spiritual life thus derived will be, in a measure otherwise impossible, both stable and satisfying. To gain these results there must be patient and intelligent search. And such search God will reward, even in the humblest of His servants, by revealing to them the wealth of consolation and instruction hidden for them in the Book of God.

Not less important than reading of the Bible is habitual and loving meditation on the great facts and teaching therein recorded. In this busy age we have special need to withdraw, as opportunity offers, from the restless activity around us, in order to contemplate the eternal realities which reign in absolute calm above and before us. These realities, as we contemplate them, will draw near to and embrace us; and will raise us, even amid the bustle of business, above the turmoil and cares which threaten to overwhelm us. Meditation will give us the light of heaven to illumine our path on earth, and enable us to estimate in their real worth or worthlessness the various objects around us. And it will save us from that which we have much reason to dread—the despotism of the present life and the present world.

Meditation will move us to pray much in secret to Him who in our solitary contemplation will come near to us. Thus shall we walk with God, and talk to God. And our intercourse with Him will clothe us with power to work for Him, and will make

our very toil a rest and delight.

These inward joys will show themselves in simplicity and reality of outward life. We shall be what we seem, and seem to be what we are. We shall thus be saved from unreality and artificial parade, which, in the present day, are so common and so hurtful. The light within us will be our guide in the details of outward life, and will enable us to choose with a true instinct those occupations and pleasures and modes of life which will be most pleasing to God, and most helpful to us. Frivolities will for us have no charm, and therefore no peril; and all healthy enjoyments will be sanctified and ennobled. We shall be neither lax in our own conduct nor censorious of others. The same inward light will also save us from the dangerous paths of business speculation, which have led so many to spiritual and eternal ruin. And, while ourselves avoiding unnecessary risks, we shall not fail to raise our voice against the various forms of gambling which unfortunately are so common around us.

The family circle and its intercourse may be, we are persuaded, a most valuable means of developing the religious life of those who compose it. It is the privilege of each member, young or old, to contribute something to the highest good of each other member. This is the divine aim of the family bond. Moreover, the various and ever-varying incidents of domestic life afford constant opportunities for self-discipline of the best kind, for such discipline as will develop all the graces of a beautiful Christian character. And domestic piety is the most powerful influence to draw to Christ the younger members of the family. Let there be spiritual reality in family prayer. And use well the leisure of the Lord's Day for mutual help by profitable conversation. Let everything in the home, its duties and its delights, be laid on the altar of God; and family life will be a perfume of perpetual incense acceptable to God.

Solitary communion with God and Christian intercourse at home will make you eager for the public preaching of the Gospel, and for the various gatherings of the people of God. Expect with confidence spiritual gain from God whenever you come together Such expectation need never be disappointed.

And your faith will greatly aid the preacher or leader. Indeed, the success of all religious services, depends very much not only on those who lead them, but on those who by their presence and their prayers support them. Let each service be matter of prayer and faith to each person present, and each service will be a fountain of blessing. Such hearers will need no exhortation to regular attendance, nor will preachers be

disheartened by inattentive congregations.

For all Christian workers we cherish heartiest sympathy and good-will. Most conspicuous among these are the many thousands of our Local-preachers, sharers with us of the public preaching of the Gospel. But for the prospect of your aid, hundreds of our chapels would never have been built; and by your labours, thousands of members have been gathered into our Church. And we cannot forget that many of you preach at great sacrifice, and under great disadvantages; that your work on the Lord's Day follows, in many cases, such toil and anxiety during the week as leave but little leisure for pulpit preparation. But your special need is ever remembered by your Master in heaven, who will give you special help. remember also that your position in active business life greatly helps you to understand the peculiar difficulties of your hearers, and may give you special influence over them. Endeavour to grasp firmly and broadly the great central truths of the Gospel; and test these truths by making them the guide and the strength of your life. You will thus obtain, day by day, matter for the pulpit which will abundantly profit your hearers. And the mental effort of preparation, and the endeavour to teach and to save others, will be an immense gain to yourselves. May God grant that during the coming year your word be fruitful of infinite blessing to thousands!

With equal affection and respect we think of our Class-leaders, our valued helpers in the oversight of the flock of Christ. Your work demands an intelligent and progressive Christian life, broad sympathies and deep solicitude for the highest welfare of each person committed to your charge. Such solicitude will make your meetings an attractive spiritual home for your members, and will be to yourselves the noblest

kind of spiritual discipline.

We rejoice that Sunday-school teaching finds work for so many of our members. It would be a great gain to themselves and to our Church if a still larger number of cultured and intelligent men and women of mature age and experience were able to take part in this work. At the same time, we readily acknowledge the benefit to our younger members of being associated, at the age when character is forming, in the direct evangelical labour of our schools. We earnestly advise careful preparation of every lesson, even those to little children; and unreserved devotion, both within and without the doors of the school, to the best interests of the scholars. As a means of moulding the character of the scholars, and of stimulating spiritual activity and developing Christian life in the teachers, we are deeply convinced that Sunday-school teaching is already working out good far beyond the thought of those who engage in it. And in view of the various currents of religious thought in the present age and the all-pervasive spirit both of doubt and of research, we are sure that our Sunday-schools may do a work of the utmost importance.

We are glad to find in so many places organized efforts to reach the masses of men and women who neglect altogether the ordinances of the Christian Church. This work we recognise as specially in harmony with the spirit and mission of Methodism. That in all Churches many godly and zealous men are engaged in the same work, is a great joy to us. heartily do we wish them success. But we are deeply conscious that we shall be unfaithful to our past history and to our mission, if we are not found in the front rank of those who are carrying the good news of salvation to these 'lost sheep of the house of Israel.' In this work, more perhaps than in any other. a skilful combination of enterprise and caution is the condition of success. Real earnestness will ever be devising new means to attain its object. Yet we must never trust to mere novelty. but must use or refuse methods according to their fitness for the end we have in view. All real good, in all sorts of persons, is wrought by the old truth which throughout the ages of Christianity has been the one means of saving men.

To join in these various labours for Christ is our high honour. And in them we need the cooperation of all our members. The greatness of the work demands in the Church of Christ universal service. Every Christian should be, in ome way, an effective soldier. The variety of work to be done these this possible. Many who cannot engage in organized work may yet by visits to the sick, to strangers, and to those who need guidance or help, and even by a few words sometimes, by fireside or wayside, do great good. And the Church needs the active exercise of all the various abilities with which God has endowed the various members of the Body of Christ.

We ask for your sympathy and help in all the departments and operations of our Church work. Your liberality God has honoured in many ways. Without it the spiritual results in this and other countries which have so frequently gladdened us would never have been gained. And, under frequent and severe commercial depression, this liberality has continued unabated to the present day. We ask for its continuance. On the foreign field many promising openings remain unoccupied through lack of funds. And the progress of our work at home demands constant and increasing expenditure. recognise also the loving and unwearied labour of many who greatly help us by attending to what may be called—the machinery of our Church: to the erection and preservation of chapels and schools; to the administration of Circuit and Connexional finances; to the material needs of the ministers, and to numberless details needful for the progress of our work. All this we gladly acknowledge as important work done for God. And a thousand acts of kindness, unrecorded but not forgotten, reveal to us the sympathy and love of the members of our flock.

We have long felt the need of some more formal reception of new members, of some service which would give visible expression to the great value of union with the professed people of God. As yet we have not been able to suggest any form or mode of reception which would be universally appropriate. But we have remitted the matter for conversation to the meetings in May next of the District Committees. We hope that before that time, in many Circuits, efforts will be made to supply this felt need. And in any such efforts we ask your cooperation.

We look forward to the coming year with perfect confidence. We intend it to be to us a year of toil, of unreserved devotion to the work of saving the lost, and building up the Church of God. And we rejoice to know that our toil will not be in vain. For the Word we preach is the Arm of God stretched out to

save. We ask you to share our toil, that you may share our success and our joy. Aid us by your prayers. Stand by us in our work. Give us your wisest counsels, and your hearty

sympathy.

The year before us will be one of personal conflict in our hearts and yours. But God will give us constant victory. For He will be our Companion in conflict. To some of you and of us it will be a year of suffering and sorrow, perhaps of severe and unexpected sorrow. Yet even this will but reveal the sufficient grace of God; and the revelation of His grace will turn our sorrow into joy. To some of us, to many of you, this will be our last year on earth. Even thus it will be our best year. Joyfully we labour, and more joyfully we shall lay down our finished task. That the night of sacred rest draws near, bids us work while it is day.

And now, brethren, accept, for the coming year, our best wishes. We look forward to the happiest and best year we have ever known. And our confident expectation rests on the sure word and the eternal love of our Father in heaven. We wish you every blessing from God our Father, and from Jesus

Christ our Lord.

THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

IRISH CONFERENCE OF 1883

TO THE

BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1883.

HONOURED FATHERS AND BELOVED BRETHREN,-

We heartily thank you for your beautiful and affectionate answer to our last year's address. We received it with more than ordinary gratitude and respect. We hasten to perform our wonted and pleasurable usage of addressing you again. We also thank you for having sent to us as your Representatives such distinguished Ministers of your Conference as your farfamed President, the Rev. Charles Garrett; your ex-President, the venerable and highly-gifted Dr. Osborn; also the Revs. Robert Newton Young, Secretary of your Conference, and George W. Olver, B.A., one of your Missionary Secretaries,brethren who have endeared themselves to us before, and of whom we cannot speak too highly now. We have also been favoured with a visit from the Rev. Dr. Butler, of the Methodist Episcopal Church of America, on his way to India. account he gave us of the Methodist Mission in Mexico was truly marvellous, and worthy of apostolic times. At the commencement of our Conference we had to fill the quota of the Legal Hundred committed to us. There was one vacancy created by the death of Rev. James Tobias, one of our most beloved brethren, and of whom we may truly say, 'A prince and a great man' has fallen in our Israel. He was nearly as well known to you as to us, by his frequent visits to your Conference as one of our Representatives. The Rev. James Donnelly, Secretary of our Conference, was elected to fill the vacancy.

The Official Sermon, delivered by the President on the evening of the first day of our Ministerial Conference, encouraged and stimulated us in our great work of saving souls,

and was accompanied by a very gracious influence of the Holy

Spirit on the congregation.

We are glad to be able to congratulate you again on the vast increase of your membership during the past year, and we heartily pray that you may increase more and more. We are sorry that we cannot afford you this year the pleasure of reciprocating our congratulations as we did last year in this respect; and yet, looking at the unusually large number of removals, emigrations, and deaths which have occurred during the year, we are sure you will rejoice with us that God has given us almost as many new members as we have lost, numbering about two thousand. We have had revivals in almost every Circuit; so that our work on the whole is in a very satisfactory state of spiritual prosperity, and we are hoping for a year of still greater success. In the promotion of these revivals, so important in the maintenance of our work in this country, the labours of the General Missionaries have been very much owned of God; and it would be most desirable, if the means were available, to increase their number. Their access to the masses is on the increase, especially in Ulster.

We notice, with gratitude, your having watched so carefully, and with so much prayerful sympathy, the peculiar circumstances of our country, both National and ecclesiastical, during the year, and for your wise and opportune counsels in those perilous times, through which the good Providence of God has safely brought us. We are happy to say that the loyalty of our people, which you justly recognise, continues unabated. As to the best means of promoting Ireland's amelioration, we fully agree with what you state, 'That our strongest confidence is not in governmental administration, but in the might and gentleness of the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ.' As we have hitherto kept ourselves free from irritating controversy, so now we are fully resolved to give our undivided attention to the proclamation of this Gospel, and to speak the truth in

love.

It is with peculiar pleasure we think of the success attending our united efforts in the advancement of public opinion on the question of Temperance; and we are full of hope that the closing of public-houses on the Sabbath will soon be universal.

We recognise your strenuous efforts to secure the repeal of the infamous Contagious Diseases Acts, and have given you our hearty support, and trust that they will not only be pre-

vented from extension, but totally abolished.

We rejoice to know that you have formed an affiliated Conference in South Africa, which promises to hasten the fulfilment of the prediction, 'Ethiopia shall soon stretch out her hands unto God.' It is satisfactory to us that we have a share in this grand enterprise, by the appointment of one of our valued brethren, the Rev. James Thompson.

You will be glad to know that our Collegiate Institutions in Belfast and Dublin have prospered very much during the past year; and we have heard with joy that yours are prospering

also.

We have observed your anxiety to preserve your Connexional Funds from embarrassment by adjusting your expenditure to your income, and we are endeavouring to pursue a similar course.

Four of our highly-esteemed brethren, who have served the Connexion long and faithfully, have obtained leave to become Supernumeraries. Five young men have completed their probation, and having passed the usual examinations with credit, have been ordained to the full work of the Christian Ministry. Six candidates, well recommended, have been accepted, and placed on the List of Reserve.

Besides the death of the Rev. James Tobias, we have to record the death of our valued brother, the Rev. Thomas Hickey, who, since his retirement from our active work, resided for many years in England, whose obituary appears in your Minutes last year, and which we now transfer to ours; and also the death of our venerable brother Henderson, who lately

passed away.

We cannot conclude this Address without gratefully noticing the kind and brotherly manner in which you allude to our relationship as a Conference to yours. You say that 'you are not, strictly speaking, affiliated to us, but rather a part and parcel of ourselves; that your Conference is an emanation from the British Conference.' We join you in your prayer that our union and unity may be true and vital; and that England and Ireland may continue to receive the richest blessings from the Fountain of our united Methodism.

We send you as our Representatives the Rev. William Crook, D.D., whom we nominate as the Irish member of the

Delegation, the Rev. J. D. Powell, and the Rev. Robert Boyd; all of whom are brethren in whom we have the fullest confidence.

We commend you to the continued care and guidance of the Great Head of the Church, who has hitherto so graciously helped and prospered you. 'Now unto the King eternal, immortal, invisible, the only wise God, be honour and glory for ever and ever. Amen.'

OF THE

BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1883

TO THE

ADDRESS OF THE IRISH CONFERENCE OF 1883.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,-

We have received your annual Address with that special interest which naturally belongs to the most ancient and most nearly related of all the Conferences, still increasing in number, which regularly exchange fraternal communications We are happy to learn not only from your Address but also from the animated speeches with which your honoured Representatives supplemented it, that your deep sense of the disadvantages and difficulties of your position does not impair your brave and hopeful assurance of final triumph. is more essential to success than that cheerful confidence in God 'which laughs at impossibilities, and cries it shall be done.' Your very hindrances are a measure of the honour which our Lord has put upon you. Yours is the post of danger and of supreme importance. Irish Romanism supplies the main strength of the Papacy in every English-speaking nation. The political strength upon which Rome so largely depends in these islands and in America is chiefly due to the Irish vote.

bulk of the Roman Catholics in England and Scotland are Irish. We are therefore directly and most painfully interested in the success of your great vocation. Our chief political, municipal, and social difficulties would become far less serious if the Irish race were Protestantized. Few things could so materially promote the highest and best interests of England and Scotland, as the conversion of Ireland to the pure Christianity of the New Testament.

We are very thankful to learn that you have been able to hold your own during the last year, and that revivals of religion have been so widespread. We are specially glad that the General Missionaries are having increased access to the masses. We ourselves are more and more disposed to devote duly qualified brethren to evangelistic work. A yet fuller return in both countries to the original Methodist custom of open-air preaching would doubtless secure the ancient results.

We greatly rejoice in the more orderly and settled condition of Ireland, and we earnestly pray that under circumstances so much more favourable to Christian work, you may speedily reap an abundant spiritual harvest. Your admirable rule of avoiding irritating controversy will greatly promote that result. The simple, positive and fervid preaching of the Gospel of Jesus Christ is in every age and country the condition of greatest success.

Your references to great social questions assure us that you are duly alive to the urgent Christian duties of our time. Drunkenness and licentiousness are the two chief plagues of Christian civilization. We are happy to inform you that during the last twelve months our Societies in England have presented to Parliament a petition containing an almost unprecedented number of signatures in favour of the closing of public-houses on Sunday. The noble example and splendid success of Ireland in securing such legislation will give us no peace until we, too, are delivered from the incalculable evils of Sunday drunkenness.

We are delighted to hear your unhesitating and strong declaration against the infamous Contagious Diseases Acts. The recent vote of the House of Commons is a most encouraging evidence of the growing power of Christian principle in that Assembly. Very much, however, has yet to be done before the bitter and infatuated advocates of State-protected vice

are overcome. But you may be assured that having laid our hand to the plough we will not look back. We will never cease to protest and to agitate until the last shred of immoral legislation has disappeared from every part of the British Empire.

The success of your Collegiate Institutions gives us much encouragement. In the Providence of God Methodism has now attained such proportions that she can no longer evade her share in the highest culture, and her responsibility in the great

seats of learning.

We lament with you the decease of those devout and faithful men to whom your Address alludes. Our ranks, too, have been terribly broken of late years. But God will raise up other workmen for His work. Amid all our apparently irreparable bereavements, the constant growth of the work, and the significant Minutes of the First Conference of South Africa, reassure us with striking signs of the unfailing presence and blessing of God.

With respect to ourselves, we are devoutly thankful to be able to say that we have at last more than supplied all the losses occasioned by the terrible divisions of the past, and that at this hour a larger number of persons are meeting in Wesleyan-Methodist Society-classes in Great Britain, than at any previous period of our history. Best of all, there is reason to believe that our Churches were never more thoroughly alive, or more truly united than they are to-day. We have had a year of great and widespread blessing, and we have every reason to expect a delightful continuance of spiritual prosperity.

We gladly and unanimously confirm your nomination of your admirable Secretary, the Rev. James Donnelly, to the vacancy in the Legal Hundred, created by the lamented death

of the Rev. James Tobias.

In conclusion, we devoutly pray that through your labours, and the labours of all the Churches of Christ, Ireland may ere long stand where she stood long ago,—when this island was the home of savage heathenism,—in the very front rank of Christian civilization, Christian culture, and Christian Missionary enterprise.

TO THE

BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1883.

DEAR AND HONOURED BRETHREN,-

Your Address, so full of sympathy, was listened to and received with gratitude by our Conference. We were deeply moved by the Christian sentiments which it expresses and encouraged by it in our arduous toil. Such a fraternal testimony from ministers who know the nature of pastoral and

missionary labour is precious to us.

We are happy to note that you follow with a lively interest our various efforts, that you sympathise with us in our difficulties and our discouragements, and that you rejoice with us in our success. We thank God that we can speak this year of gracious revivals, especially in our southern stations. Special Prayer-meetings have been established in order to ask of God to revive us again, and the Lord has already answered our prayers by shedding abroad His Holy Spirit upon our churches. We have felt the necessity of seeking that power from on high which is the gift of God, and that convincing speech which awakens the conscience and stirs the heart. These revivals have enabled us to report an increase of five per cent. upon the number of members, with a considerable number of persons on trial. In some places the revival is still going forward, so that we anticipate further prosperity.

Hitherto French Methodism has sought to carry on, in its relations to other Protestant Churches, the large and liberal

principles on which it was established by its founders. At the present time we feel strongly the utility of circumscribing our efforts and concentrating them upon our own special fields of labour; and, without forgetting the motto of Wesley, 'The friend of all, the enemy of none,' we are led to attach increasing importance to the discipline of Methodism, and to reserve the special privileges of our Church for those who are its attached members. Already, in several Circuits, we see that this method leads to satisfactory results, and that it produces a higher appreciation of the advantages of our special organization. While we hope ever to maintain a most respectful and friendly attitude towards other religious bodies, we find an element of strength and of progress in a Christian independence of position.

We know that whilst you share our joys, you also unite your prayers with ours, that the Lord may sustain and direct us in our difficulties. One of our greatest embarrassments is our straitened financial position. We are carefully studying the means of overcoming this difficulty, without having recourse to the painful expedient of abandoning any of the posts which

we at present occupy.

Like yourselves, we watch with jealous care the influence of those currents of theological thought which, in France as elsewhere, affect the stability of ancient beliefs and give birth to enervating rationalistic theories. The Theological Seminaries of France and Switzerland are not unaffected by these tendencies. We, therefore, pay special attention to the doctrinal views of our own students, in order to maintain in our own Church a faith founded not on the wisdom of men, but on the Word and Power of God.

We have received into full Connexion two young ministers who had satisfactorily completed their four years of probation. After having undergone the usual examinations before the District Meeting and the Conference, they were unanimously accepted. A holy influence was felt during the Ordination

Service, which was deeply edifying and solemn.

We follow with unabating interest the development of your work in all parts of the world. We rejoice that while, at home, you can count an increase of more than thirteen thousand members, you have been able to establish in Southern Africa a new Affiliated Conference, thus recognising the success

and importance of your past Missionary operations in that field, and throwing upon its rising churches the responsibilities of independent life.

By your Christian sympathy you have shared in our toils, our difficulties and our triumphs; and we assure you that we also rejoice in your great success in the work of spreading our common Methodism. We believe this to be the mission which the Lord has entrusted to us, in which He has blessed us. And for His blessing we will together give thanks and will take courage to labour on as long as He shall be pleased to employ us on earth.

We hoped to have seen again in the midst of us our beloved friend and brother, the Rev. G. W. Olver, whose Christian cordiality and valuable counsels we have learned to appreciate. The Rev. W. Gibson, your Representative among us, was only able to attend a few of our later sittings: he was able, however, to rejoice with us in hearing of our spiritual success, and to encourage us by accounts of his own special work in the North of France.

And now, beloved and honoured brethren, we thank you once more for the encouragement and the Christian help which we receive from you, and we entreat the Lord to grant both to us and to you to see fresh successes, and to receive new and abundant blessings in our families and in our hearts, that we may continually minister 'to the edifying of the saints.'

We have re-elected to the office of President of the Conference, our honoured Brother, the Rev. W. Cornforth, and we respectfully request you to ratify our choice.

We have delegated as our Representative to the sessions of your Conference our esteemed and beloved brother, the Rev. Matthieu Lelièvre.

We earnestly pray that the great Head of the Church may guide all your deliberations, and crown your work in all its departments with His blessing.

THE ANSWER

OF THE

BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1883

TO THE

ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE EVAN-GELICAL METHODIST CHURCH IN FRANCE AND SWITZERLAND, 1888.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN.-

We have listened with joy to the hopeful words of your Address, and to the clear and instructive statements of your Representative, the Rev. M. Lelièvre, whom we cordially welcome among us. Our hearts are filled with deep gratitude to Almighty God as we hear of the increase which has crowned your labours. The state of your Church must ever be to us of deep and personal interest; not only have we the common joy of each seeing the other's prosperity, but your success gives the hope that the vast influence which has been exercised by France in the past over all civilized lands, will in the future be used for the promotion, instead of the hindrance, of truth and religion. We are proving to day that France, rather than Italy, is the centre of the strength of the Papal power, and that your land is the principal source of the wealth of the Propaganda. We have been but too painfully reminded of late, that while at home your country is politically hostile to the pretensions of the Church of Rome, abroad her diplomacy has afforded only too powerful aid to the machinations of intriguing priests, and is threatening the peace of some of the most successful of Protestant missions. We therefore rejoice the more at the glad tidings you have sent us, that 'The Lord has been shedding His Holy Spirit upon the Churches,' and bestowing power from on high. We trust that continuance in the means that have been so much blessed will produce even

mightier results, and that France will thus become a true fount

of religious light and knowledge.

The anxiety you express respecting the rapid growth of rationalistic theology has been long shared by us. deceived by specious theories have lost their love for Christ. Many governed by evil passions seek excuses for their alienation from God. Many led captive by a science, falsely so-called. have denied Him that made them. Many have been perverted by a vain philosophy. And yet while we deplore the errors which are causing so much mischief, and seek by all the means in our power to remedy so great evils, we think that even amidst these difficulties hopeful signs may be found. Hostility is better than indifference; it proves that the conscience is not utterly dead. That scientific opposition, of which we are so often told, is not, when genuine, so much caused by hatred of religion as by ignorance of the teachings and relations of nature and revealed truth. The past has proved that a captious criticism catching at every seeming contradiction may for a moment delude men into unbelief, but in the end only succeeds in placing on a firmer basis the evidence of the truth of God's These questionings and doubtings, which cause so much fear to you, may be the cry of men lost in darkness, who are seeking for the light, and to you above all may be the joy of gently leading such to Christ. But if your opportunities are greater, your difficulties also are greater than ours; we have to contend with hatred of the truth, and with the hardness that comes upon those who hear often and neglect the warnings of the Gospel; you have to battle with the repulsion excited by a corrupt and degraded Christianity. Victory over such foes cannot be expected in a moment. Patient and steady work is the best antidote for the poison which is insidiously destroying so many. But while we deplore that so much strength seems to be exhausted in controversy, we must remember that struggle and difficulty are not all loss; peace brings its own perils. The history of your own France warns us that perfect success over the errors of foolish speculation may bring other and worse dangers. The Church of Rome, when she had crushed every opponent, losing the stimulus of opposition, became even more corrupt than she was before. We pray that God may grant you abundantly the Spirit of Wisdom.

We note with especial satisfaction your determination 'to attach increasing importance to the discipline of Methodism.' We love all who love the Lord Jesus; we rejoice in their prosperity, and are ever wishful to render them sympathy and aid. But we, as Methodists, have a mission of our own,—to preach Christ as a present Saviour from sin, to testify to the joy of constant communion with God, to tell of the felt witness of the Holy Spirit, to exhibit practical godliness in the daily life is our special aim; and we think that this is best secured by adhering to the methods used by our fathers. We do not believe that by reserving the privileges of our own Church to our own people you show any lack of fraternal affection for other Churches. The experience of the past year has proved to you that Christian independence brings increase of strength. And we can adopt no surer means of deepening our love to Christ, of showing forth in the daily life the graces of the Holy Spirit, and of affording true help to other communions, than by prizing and using the fellowship of believers. We therefore urge upon you the culture of the social means of grace, and the careful observance of those institutions which are peculiar to our Methodism. The Class-meeting has long been to us a source of strength; many whose love for Christ was becoming cold have been brought by it into close fellowship with their Saviour. And we believe that insistence upon the necessity of constantly attending such a help to growth in the spiritual life is a duty which cannot with impunity be neglected by those who call themselves Methodists; and that by strictly enforcing this branch of our discipline we shall secure the richest development of our spiritual character, and promote most effectively our endeavour to bring the Gospel to others.

Your representative has intimated the existence of a fear that English Methodism will forsake French Methodism. We recognise the difficulties that arise from the comparative poverty of so many of your members; we watch with affectionate solicitude your endeavours to meet financial embarrassments; we would never willingly place a burden upon you that would be crushing; but we look forward to the time when we shall see in France a self-supporting Methodism. As M. Lelièvre told us, few English people 'have an adequate knowledge of France and French life, and especially of the religious state and prospects of France.' We see that there

are not only individual but national idiosyncrasies; and consequently the citizens of one land can never either completely understand or provide for the wants of those of another; before the establishment of your Conference we were two unequally yoked together. We believe that complete independence is desirable for your own sake; many of our own Societies have found that the pressure of debt has roused energies which once in action have not only removed financial difficulty, but extended the kingdom of God; through their poverty as to this world they have become rich in regard to that which is to come. We do not wish to abandon you, it would be cruel to thrust away a helpless child; but it would be foolish to retain a grown man in even the semblance of tutelage. Mean-

while, we assure you of our constant sympathy.

We cannot refrain from reminding you of the need of availing yourselves of every opportunity of doing good. The sky is full of the tokens of change. The age is one of unrest. To-day there is a vast mass of men in France halting between two opinions. The Gospel can be freely preached everywhere. Many are eagerly enquiring, Where is the truth? No one can tell what the morrow may bring forth. The present and the present only is yours. To-day you have the right of free utterance, to-morrow your mouths may be closed. Now multitudes are undecided, then, if unreached by the message of peace, their hearts may be hardened against the truth. We can only pray that He, in whose hand are the hearts of all men, may give you grace to use your utmost diligence, and out of those who are now wondering where the light is, may raise up heroes who shall win your country for Him whose right alone it is to reign.

We have acceded to your request, and have appointed the

Rev. W. Cornforth to be your President.

CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN-METHODIST CHURCH OF SOUTH AFRICA OF 1883

TO THE

BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1883.

BELOVED FATHERS AND BRETHREN,-

Assembled in this our first Conference, we acknowledge with devout thankfulness the wonderful Providence of Almighty God in the establishment and development of Wesleyan Missions in South Africa. 'The Lord hath done great things for us; whereof we are glad.'

Upwards of sixty years ago the foundations of the South African Methodist Church were laid. Faithful and devoted missionaries, whose praise is in all the Churches, brought to this country the doctrines, mode of worship, means of fellowship and general church economy so greatly owned of God in the fatherland. The rapid growth of prosperous churches prepared the way for vigorous and systematic aggression in regions beyond.

The principles actuating these heroic pioneers, and loyally adhered to by their successors, have resulted in the formation of Colonial and Native churches, so numerous and important as to justify and demand the momentous change which has now taken effect. The success of the past warrants the anticipation that, with a more complete organization and more efficient control, still greater successes will be realized. Having this hope, we do not forget the absolute necessity for continued and united prayer to secure the Divine blessing, nor the need of a fuller consecration of our hearts and lives to Christ and to the great work to which we are called.

With much prayer for heavenly guidance, we have carefully considered the constitution of the Conference which has been granted to us by your recent action. We recognize and ap-

preciate the wise and generous counsels which directed your deliberations, and humbly and hopefully accept the weighty responsibility now laid upon us by the head of the Church. We assure you of our unswerving loyalty to our common Lord, and of our determination to maintain the great Connexional principles which bind us together, and contribute so largely to our success in extending the Redeemer's kingdom. We confidently rely on your sympathy and prayers; and not on yours only, but on those also of all the Conferences which stand in the same relation with ourselves to British Methodism.

In undertaking the charge entrusted to us we note with deep satisfaction your concern not only 'that the existing Missions should be carefully nurtured, but that the establishment of a South African Conference, while greatly benefiting the Colonists, should equally conduce to the extension of Missionary operations among the native races.' We assure you, that the complete evangelization and the intellectual and moral elevation of these races will continue to be the object of our most earnest solici-

tude and labour.

We are conscious that the practical carrying out of these new arrangements will very much depend on harmonious action between the two elements—European and Native. The spirit which dwells in you dwells also in us. We are sensible that this is the most delicate and difficult of the many delicate and difficult questions which will demand attention. The 'wisdom which cometh from above' can alone direct us so to order all things as to realize a united Conference—men of different races working hand in hand for the glory of Him whose love has made us one, and who has 'redeemed us to God by His blood, out of every kindred, and tongue, and people and nation.'

The importance of organizing a Missionary Society in connection with the South African Conference is fully recognised by us. The vitality and growth of Churches already formed depend on our fidelity to the Missionary spirit of our forefathers. It will be our unceasing care to foster and develop that spirit. The increased financial responsibilities inseparable from our present position must be honestly undertaken. Our people suffer, in common with others, from the commercial depression which prevails throughout the whole of the Colony. They will, nevertheless, according to the ability which God has given them, cheerfully respond to all such claims as may arise in connec-

tion with the Churches already formed, while the remembrance of the countless benefits they have themselves derived will be an incentive to a liberal support of such Missionary operations as may be carried on beyond the bounds of their own Conference.

The kind and generous spirit which has actuated the Conference in the financial arrangements of the new economy awakens our liveliest gratitude. It may be long before we shall be able to dispense with the pecuniary assistance of the Missionary Committee, but this end will be steadily and persistently kept in view. Great will be our joy when the subsidies now received by us can be wholly set free for the prosecution of that aggressive work so imperatively demanded in the heart of this Continent and in other lands.

For some time to come we shall have to look to you not only for financial aid, but also for a supply of duly-qualified ministers of the Lord Jesus Christ. Our confident expectation is, that men imbued with true Missionary spirit will be found ready, for Christ's sake, to give themselves to us and to the Lord: rejoicing in the call to preach to their fellow-countrymen and the native races the glorious Gospel of the Blessed God.

The great importance of Christian education was recognised by the founders of our Church in this land; but from the beginning this work has been beset with difficulties. Much has been accomplished, as the returns of our numerous dayschools abundantly show. We rejoice also in the establishment of schools of a higher class, both for boys and girls of European descent, and of industrial and training institutions for the benefit of the different native tribes.

In accordance with your request steps will be taken to prepare a 'uniform Deed,' with a view to the settlement of all our Trust Property. We anticipate some difficulty and delay in cases where the property lies in countries and districts outside the rule of Her Majesty the Queen; but the entire question, in its widely-varied bearings, has our earnest attention.

We rejoice greatly in the appointment of the Rev. John Walton, M.A., as our first President. The feelings of love and confidence which we cherished towards him have been intensified by the wisdom and ability with which he has directed

our business. His guiding hand at such a time has been of priceless value. His intimate acquaintance with the principles and polity of Methodism, combined with an extensive knowledge of our work in this country, eminently qualify him for the honourable and laborious position he has been called to occupy. We need not say that his kind and genial spirit has endeared him to all the brethren. We have nominated him as our President for next year, and feel confident that this nomination will meet with your approval.

The presence of the Rev. Owen Watkins, Chairman of the Transvaal and Swaziland District, afforded us much satisfaction. His address at our open session cheered our hearts, and excited universal interest. Our sympathy and prayers attend him in his self-denying labours to carry the Gospel

of Christ into distant regions.

The fact that in this our first Conference we are able to report gracious outpourings of God's Spirit in many Colonial Circuits and Mission Stations, resulting in the addition of 1,644 members, inspires us with strong hope for the future. This is a token for good in which you, together with ourselves, will greatly rejoice. God will 'be with us as He was with our fathers.'

In commencing the work of another year we rest on the Divine promise, 'As thy days so shall thy strength be.' Pray for us that we may receive a richer baptism from on high, and be endued with the power of the Holy Ghost. We are witnesses for God's truth among men of many tongues, and varying degrees of civilization. Vast fields still lie uncultivated within our limits; while beyond and before us an unlimited area of heathenism reminds us of the Saviour's command, 'Go into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature.'

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,-

It is with no ordinary pleasure that we receive the Address of your First Conference. The interest with which its statements were listened to in our open Session was deepened by the spoken address of the Rev. John Kilner, whose intimate knowledge of your work, and generous sympathies with your difficulties, entitle him to be your Representative.

With you, we thankfully acknowledge that by the blessing of God upon the labours of faithful and devoted Missionaries, your present position has been secured. We join with you in prayer that you may be enabled by continued fidelity to the truths of the Gospel, and by a zealous upholding of the Connexional principles and institutions of our Church, to Iay the foundations, deep and broad, of an agency which shall help to mould the life of your varied communities, and prepare your country for the prosperous future which we believe awaits it.

Whatever strength Methodism has in this country and in other lands where there are affiliated Conferences, is due, under God, to the Doctrinal unity of our Ministry, and to the maintenance of the institutions of Christian fellowship, by which the first Methodist Societies were formed. We are persuaded that your strength must be sustained by walking by the same rule, and minding the same thing.

We look with intense interest, dear brethren, upon the

Missionary situation of your Colonial churches. The contact of the Christian religion and civilization of the colonists with semi-savage races, is intended by God to have a Missionary influence upon the dense heathenism of the far interior; and we are persuaded that in the spirit of our fathers,—a spirit made bold by faith, and prudent by experience,-you will be prepared to enter the great and effectual door which Providence is opening before you, and help to bring 'the light of the knowledge of the glory of God' to them that 'sit in darkness,' and to them that dwell in the land of 'the shadow of death.'

No part of your Address gives us greater gratification than your avowal, 'That the complete evangelization and the intellectual and moral elevation of the Native races shall be the object of your most earnest solicitude and labour.' In carrying out this noble resolve, we recognise, with you, the importance of the organization and efficient maintenance of a Missionary Society; and we sympathize with you in your anxious endeavours to foster and develop the Missionary spirit. It is only as we are at once conservative and aggressive. that the end of our existence as a Church can be attained. If we care only for those of our own race, we close against ourselves a field which calls into exercise the noblest feelings of the Christian, we lose the blessing of Him who gave 'His life a ransom for all.'

In committing to you the full responsibility of Missionary operations within the Colonies and neighbouring native territories of South Africa, we gratefully acknowledge the valuable assistance, both financial and personal, hitherto afforded by the laity of South African Methodism. Owing countless benefits themselves to the Spirit who awakens all Missionary zeal and directs all Missionary labour, we rejoice that they are yielding to this gracious impulse; and now that they are enjoying the advantages of self-government we believe they will be incited to further zeal and liberality for carrying on the work with efficiency. In all your successes we shall still rejoice, and you may be assured of our sympathy in any hour of trial.

We fully sympathize with you in the many delicate and difficult questions affecting the united action of a Conference of both Europeans and Natives, and exceedingly rejoice to observe your hearty cooperation in maintaining those great

principles which bind us together. Having one fellowship and one interest, working together for the glory of Him whose love has made you one, we pray that you may continue to be directed by the 'wisdom' that cometh from above, which is 'first pure, then peaceable, . . . easy to be entreated, full of mercy

and good fruits.'

We note with joy your acknowledgment of the efforts of the founders of your Church in making provision for the Christian education and culture of the sons and daughters of intelligent Methodists. It is worth much to have the moulding of the mind and the direction of the studies of our young people, and the Church which secures this advantage secures for itself a prosperous future. We cherish the hope that in all your educational and training Institutions you will continue to train up the youth of our congregations, both European and Native, in the doctrines, privileges and duties of the Christian religion; and that whilst so doing, the God of our fathers will cause you to joy before Him 'in harvest, and as men rejoice when they divide the spoil.'

We rejoice with you in reviewing the tokens of spiritual prosperity with which you have been cheered during the first year of your Connexional life, more especially that most grateful sign of the Divine favour, in the accession of many souls to the Church. These we fervently hope are but the firstfruits of a mighty harvest yet to be reaped in the vast field which is before you. From these, we trust a supply of faithful labourers will be gathered who shall carry on the work now entrusted

to you.

You will rejoice to hear that during the past year we have not been permitted to labour in vain. Our numbers are increased by 13,331, and an earnest of good exists in the fact that 34,399 are on trial for membership. During the several sessions of our present Conference, and in the public services connected with it, we have been favoured with manifest tokens of the Divine presence. Our people have been edified, we ourselves have been strengthened, and shall return to our Circuits with renewed consecration to the duties of our holy calling.

We have much pleasure in according to your request in appointing the Rev. John Walton, M.A., the President of your next Annual Conference. We know his approved ability and

varied qualifications for the honourable and responsible position, and have full confidence that under his wise and prudent direction your Church may not only be consolidated, but

largely extended.

As sharers in the blessings of the 'common salvation,' and as one with you in all that concerns the prosperity of the kingdom of our great God and Saviour Jesus Christ, we bear you in our hearts at the throne of grace. THE ANSWER

OF THE

GENERAL CONFERENCE

OF THE

METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES TO THE ADDRESS OF THE BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1879.

HONOURED FATHERS AND BRETHREN,-

'Grace be unto you, and peace, from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.'

It is with the greatest satisfaction and pleasure that we have received your Fraternal Address, and have welcomed among us the beloved brethren who brought us your kindly greetings, and have spoken to us many soul-stirring words. It was a special gratification to have present among us again, after the lapse of a quarter of a century, the distinguished and venerable William Arthur, who, in his former official visit, left with us hallowed influences which can never be forgotten. His writings have been an inspiration to multitudes; his noble words, uttered in the hour of our country's peril, are treasured in the hearts of American patriots; his praise is in all our Churches, and his presence with us at this General Conference has been a benediction. Nor can we too highly compliment the genial Christian spirit, vigorous thought and moving eloquence of the Rev. F. W. Macdonald, whom you deputed as the companion of Mr. Arthur, and whose able and thrilling address before our Conference will be a lasting honour both to himself and to you.

We give thanks to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ for the gracious favour and manifold blessings He has bestowed upon you and upon the interests of our common Methodism in all the world. To your venerable Body our hearts turn as to the mother of us all, and we greatly rejoice

in all your work and labour of love.

We notice with much interest the introduction of Lay Representation into your Conference, and doubt not that the temporal and spiritual interests of the Church will be promoted thereby. We have found, after fair trial, that our brethren of the laity are a most valuable and efficient element in our General Conference. They are strongly attached to our doctrines and polity; and we believe they act as a conserving bond of power upon our general system. Their counsels and activity have shown to great advantage in the benevolent enterprises of the Church, and we are now deliberating plans for their representation in our Annual Conferences.

We gratefully rejoice in the success which has thus far attended your measures to create a Thanksgiving Fund, which shall be a Church Redemption and Church Extension Fund, and a Memorial, as well as a great Connexional Thank-Offering. This grand conception was worthy of the great Wesleyan Connexion of England, and the remarkable results of the movement in a time of commercial depression is assurance that the Church is not unmindful of her opportunities and her power.

During the past quadrennium our Church has been active in carrying forward her Missionary work at home and abroad. Notwithstanding the long period of financial depression, the debt upon our Missionary treasury, which four years ago was over \$262,000 has been reduced to about \$63,000. With the exception of Bulgaria, where our work was interrupted by the war between Russia and Turkey, our Foreign Missions have been steadily advancing in influence and power. In Mexico, South America, Africa, Italy, Switzerland, Germany, Denmark, Norway and Sweden, India, China and Japan, our brethren are vigorously assailing the strongholds of darkness, and building up the institutions of a pure, Scriptural Christianity. of these fields our Woman's Foreign Missionary Society has been a most efficient helper, collecting and disbursing thousands of dollars annually for the redemption of the down-trodden women of heathen lands from the ignorance and degradation in which they have been held so long.

Our Board of Church Extension has been doing praiseworthy service in building churches, especially in the South and on the Western frontier. Our Freedmen's Aid Society continues active operations in educating the coloured people of the Southern States. Our Sunday-School Union and Tract Society exhibit growing zeal and success in all parts of the country, and are spreading their publications by the million. Most of our literary institutions are enjoying a commendable prosperity, and some of them have greatly increased their permanent endowment and the facilities for their work. Our publishing houses are constantly issuing works of standard value, and our periodicals are circulated and read among hundreds of thousands. By these various agencies, and by the regular ministry of the Word, the Gospel has had great triumph among us, and during the last quadrennium our statistics show a net increase of 713 Travelling Preachers, 119,745 members, and 1,322 Church-buildings, which is more than one church for every working day in the four years.

It is with humble gratitude to Almighty God that we note the number and magnitude of these several departments of our Christian work. These have grown upon us as from all parts of our broad land, and also from other lands, have come to us the pressing Macedonian calls for help. And yet, with all this, we feel that we are falling far short of our possibilities, and we have constant need to admonish one another of our

duties and responsibilities.

We reciprocate the feeling of responsibility which you express in view of the enemies of our holy religion. Antichrist appears in many forms: in a worldly spirit creeping into some of the Churches; in a sensuous luxury 'which eats the core from manly virtue; in a materialistic philosophy; in the pretensions of science falsely so called; in Popish and Jesuitical cunning, active against the institutions of civil and religious liberty; in the rationalistic speculation turned against the doctrines of the Gospel. These forms of evil, as well as those more open and virulent, call upon us, according to our position and influence among evangelical Churches, to 'contend earnestly for the faith once delivered to the saints.' We should be untrue to the spirit of Methodism, and unworthy of our noble fathers, should we show ourselves careless or indifferent when threatened by so many enemies. Let us duly appreciate the power of organized action and of sanctified learn-Let us hold with undying love to our discipline and polity, so efficient under God for Christian work. Let us more and

more cherish our doctrines, so practical and potent, and our

personal experience of the salvation of God in Christ.

During this session of our General Conference, an Œcumenical Conference, composed of Representatives from eleven different Methodist bodies, and at which your delegates were present and spoke, has recommended the holding of a Methodist Œcumenical Conference, in City Road Chapel, London, some time in the summer of 1881. We doubt not the holding of such a Conference will result in strengthening the ties which bind us to each other, and in fitting us all for more thorough and efficient work in spreading Scriptural holiness through the world.

APPENDIX I.

METROPOLITAN CHAPEL BUILDING FUND.

THE following is a Summary of the work done during the past year:—

I .- CHAPELS OPENED, AND SITES PURCHASED, ETC.

1. Chapels opened, three; viz., Addiscombe, Willesden, and Streatham.

2. Sites purchased, two, West Green and Catford Bridge; making with sites held at Agincourt Road, Amhurst Park, Denmark Park, Forest Hill, Hornsey, Sutton and Walham Green sites for the erection of the remainder of the fifty Chapels specially contemplated twelve years since, in the forma-

tion of the Special Provincial Fund.

Taking a comprehensive retrospect, the Committee report that since 1861, when the Fund was created, and when only ten Metropolitan Chapels, each accommodating 1000 hearers, existed, sixty-four such Chapels have been built, round which have been placed Lecture Halls, Schools, Class-rooms and all other similar appliances. Meanwhile, about 100 smaller Chapels have also been erected, showing a most gratifying extension of Methodism in the metropolis.

The Committee further report (1): That, acting on the instructions given by the Conference of 1880, they have adopted a conditional scheme for promoting the erection of smaller Chapels, of which the following is a brief abstract:—That in every case provision shall be contemplated for at least 600 sittings, but that assistance may be given towards the purchase of sites and the erection of Chapels that in the first instance will accommodate only 400 persons, provided (i) that these sittings

shall be all upon the ground floor; (ii) that the site shall be of at least sufficient size for a building to contain 600 sittings; (3) that the Chapel shall be so constructed as to allow, if the site permit, of inexpensive enlargement for 750 or 1000 sittings.

(2) The following resolution was adopted:—That the Conference be requested to authorize the London District Meetings to insert in their Order and Form of Business the following question: 'Have the Chapel Trusts that have been assisted by the Metropolitan Chapel Building Fund contributed to the Fund their annual repayment of loans, and their subscriptions according to the resolution of the Committee?'

II.—FINANCES.

(A) Income.—The income of the year has been as under:—
(1.) Metropolitan Contributions, £1,561 10s. 1d. (2.) Special Provincial Fund, £1,449. (3.) Executors of the late Sir F. Lycett, £3,076 18s. 8d. (4.) Repaid Loans, £1,899 5s.; altogether with balances, interest on deposits, and investments sold, the Income of the Fund has been £11,429 9s. 4d.

(B.) Expenditure.—The grants and loans paid have amounted to £6,500. The legal expenses incurred in the defence of Sir

F. Lycett's Will are £191 13s.

The entire expenditure leaves a balance of £4,049 18s.11d. in the City Bank, but the claims already allowed and impending will demand a far larger amount than this balance. The amount outstanding in loans is £27,548 15s.

APPENDIX III.

ABSTRACT OF THE REPORT

OF

THE CHILDREN'S HOME AND ORPHANAGE.

The income of the year shows a very healthy increase on that of its predecessors. The ordinary subscriptions and donations show an increase of £765 18s. 2d. The subscriptions from Sunday-schools also show an increase of £239 14s. 2d. The Birthday Society, which has now got into vigorous operation, has produced £655 10s. 6d. Since the conclusion of the financial year, extensive repairs have become necessary at the London Branch, owing to defects in the foundation of one group of buildings. But when these are effected, the premises throughout may be said to be in thoroughly good working order.

The erection of the new Branch known as ! The Princess Alice Orphanage,' has been commenced during the year. foundation stone was laid in September by Mr. Samuel Jevons, . the son of the gentleman whose liberal gift prompted the undertaking of this new enterprise. A section of the buildings will soon be completed, when it is hoped that operations may speedily be commenced by the reception of fifty orphan children. It is obvious, that if house after house be erected in the future, the amount invested will become smaller and smaller, and, therefore, the Committee will not feel themselves justified in going beyond the modest commencement they propose to make, unless they are encouraged by a considerable increase of Income. separate and distinct appeal will be made for it. Any moneys allocated specially to it, whether as Donations or Annual Subscriptions, will be strictly reserved for its uses; but otherwise it will be dependent upon the General Fund, which supports all hitherto existing Branches of the work. It will be seen therefore, that our friends who enlarge their contributions towards the General Fund of this department will, in the most direct and practical way, enable the Committee to utilise to its fullest capacity the new Branch.

APPENDIX V.

ABSTRACT OF REPORT UPON THE EXAMINATION OF PREACHERS ON TRIAL.

PRESENTED TO THE CONFERENCE, 1883.

The Examination was held as directed by the last Conference, on Tuesday, April 3rd, and Wednesday, April 4th. On the first of these two days the probationers were examined in the first three subjects of examination prescribed by the Conference for the several years of probation, and the remaining subjects were taken, so far as circumstances required or permitted, on the second day named.

Some candidates for ordination who had not taken or completed their examination, or who were affected by the Resolution 10 (Minutes, p. 201), of the last Conference, respecting examination in two Scripture subjects, were examined early in May, so far as was necessary, in the subjects referred to, and the results were reported to the District Meetings concerned.

A supplementary examination, in accordance with Resolution 15 (Minutes, 1882, p. 202), was held early in July. It was attended by one probationer of the third year, by four of the second, and by two of the first year.

Every probationer, excepting one, (who is not a candidate for ordination) attended either the ordinary examination in April,

or the supplementary one in July.

The Examination Committee, acting with the concurrence of the President of the Conference, arranged for the special examination of all the young men who completed at the Conference of 1882 their term of three years' residence in the Theological Institution. It included all the subjects prescribed by the Conference of 1882, for preachers in their first year of probation, with the addition of a subject vi., Exodus xvii-xx, in Hebrew. Every ex-student (except one who was unwell) from the Institution, for whom this special examination was provided, and who was not excused from examination in Hebrew by his Tutors, accepted examination in this subject. Twelve young men who had not, in accordance with existing regulations of

the Conference, entered upon probation, were thus examined, and wrote forty-eight papers. One only of these obtained a place in the Honours list, and the higher marks were only obtained by a small proportion of the papers, but the results of the special examination were very fairly satisfactory. They were reported to each District meeting concerned, the report being accompanied by an explanatory circular.

Resolution 10 of the Conference 1882 (Minutes, p. 201), relating to examination in Scripture, was carefully attended to, and the results of the 'two examinations' for which it provides

are specially reported to the Conference.

Four probationers (three of whom had been three years at the Theological Institution, and one two years), who had not been excused from examination in Greek by their tutors, did not present a Greek Testament paper, three of whom were in the fourth year of probation, and one was in the second. Similarly, one probationer of the fourth year did not present a Hebrew paper.

In all, 135 young men were examined: of these 123 were recognised probationers, of whom 14 had not been at the Theological Institution, and 109 had been there during varying periods (5 for fully four years, 89 for three years, and the remainder for shorter periods), and 12 Examinees were not recognised probationers.

The general result of the Examination of the probationers of

each year was as follows :-

FIRST YEAR.—12 probationers were examined: who wrote 93 papers, the valuation marks of which were as follows:—i+,1; i,17; ii+,8; ii,19; iii+,20; iii,16; iv+,9; iv,3.

Five probationers were placed in the Honours list.

SECOND YEAR.—25 probationers were examined: who wrote 121 papers, the valuation marks of which were as follows:—i, 3; ii+, 11; ii, 35; iii+, 22; iii, 27; iv+, 6; iv, 9. Failures, 8. Six probationers were placed in the Honours list.

THED YEAR.—18 Probationers were examined: who wrote 99 papers, the valuation marks of which were as follows:—i, 10; ii+, 6; ii, 20; iii+, 25; iii, 20; iv+, 6; iv, 8. Failures, 4. Three probationers were placed in the Honours list.

FOURTH YEAR.—67 probationers were examined: who wrote 331 papers, the valuation marks of which were as follows:—i+, 6; i, 14; ii+, 31; ii, 75; iii+, 61; iii, 71; iv+, 35; iv, 31. Failures, 7. Eleven probationers were placed in the Honours list.

APPENDIX VI.

LAY REPRESENTATION IN THE CONFERENCE.

THE following are the Resolutions of the Conference of 1877

on the subject of Lay Representation:—

I. The Conference, when considering such matters as are hereinafter declared to be within the province of Ministers and Laymen acting conjointly, shall consist of the President of the Conference, and of 240 Ministers and 240 Laymen.

(i.) The Ministerial Members of the Conference when the Lay Representatives are present shall be, in addition to the President and all other Members of the Legal Conference for the time being who shall have declared at the May Meeting of the District Committee their intention to attend the Conference:—

(a) Any Assistant Secretary of the Conference, not being a

member of the Legal Conference.

(b) All Chairmen of Districts in Great Britain, not being

members of the Legal Conference.

(c) Six Ministers in Full Connexion, stationed in Foreign Districts, who may be in England at the time of the sitting of the Conference. The Conference when consisting of Ministers only shall determine in what manner such Ministers shall be chosen; or if there be not six such Ministers in England at the time of the sittings of the Conference, in what manner their places shall be supplied.

(d) If, in any year, any Department would not, in the judgment of the Conference, be adequately represented by Members of the Legal Conference, provision shall be made for the Ministerial Representation of such Department by the preceding Conference when consisting of Ministers

(e) The remaining Ministerial Members of the Conference, when composed of Ministers and Laymen, shall be elected at the Annual Meetings in May of the District Committees in Great Britain, as follows:—The Ministerial Members of each District Committee shall elect from their own number so many Ministers as, by the allocation of the Conference preceding, are entitled to attend the ensuing Conference. From the Ministers so elected, the Ministerial Members of each District Committee shall elect by vote, taken by ballot after nomination, so many Ministers as were allocated by the preceding Conference to represent such District in the Conference when composed of Ministers and Laymen.

N.B.—The newly-elected Members of the Legal Conference in each year shall be Members of the Conference when

composed of Ministers and Laymen.

(ii.) No Layman shall be eligible as a Representative, whether elected annually by the Conference or by the May Meeting of the District Committee, unless he be a Member of Society of five years' continuous standing, and, at the time of his election by the Conference or nomination in the District Committee, a holder of office as a Trustee of Connexional Property, a member of a Circuit Quarterly Meeting, or a member of a District Committee. Any Layman nominated in a District Committee must be a Member of Society in some Circuit within that District.

- (a) One-eighth of the Lay Representatives shall be elected annually by the Conference when composed of Ministers and Laymen; but in the case of the first Conference to be held after the adoption of this Scheme, by the preceding Conference. This number shall in all cases include the Lay Treasurers of the following General Connexional Funds—namely, the Foreign Missions Fund, the Schools' Fund, the Chapel Fund, the Metropolitan Chapel Building Fund, the Children's Fund, the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund, the Auxiliary Fund, the Theological Institution Fund, the Education Fund, and the Fund for the Extension of Methodism in Great Britain, for the time being. One-third of the remaining number elected in the first instance by the Conference shall retire at the end of the first year; one-third at the end of the second year; and one-third at the end of the third year. This arrangement for retirement in rotation shall be continued from year to year, and the Lay Representatives so retiring shall not be immediately eligible for re-election by the Con-
- (b) For the present, the election of the remaining Lay Representatives to the Conference shall be by the separate

vote of the Laymen, taken by ballot after nomination, in the May Meetings of the District Committees; such nomination to be by the Lay Members only. The Circuit Stewards of each Circuit shall be called upon at the March Quarterly Meeting to declare their ability and willingness to attend the ensuing Annual Meeting of the District Committee in May, or the contrary. If they, or either of them, shall declare inability or unwillingness to attend the said District Committee, the Quarterly Meeting shall have the right of electing by and from its own members, and by open vote, a Representative or Representatives to supply the vacancy or vacancies so created.

(c) The number of Laymen to be elected in each District shall be determined by each preceding Conference when consisting of Ministers and Laymen; but, in the case of the first Conference to be held after the adoption of this

Scheme, by the preceding Conference.

II. The business to be transacted by the Conference when consisting of Ministers only shall be completed before that which is to be transacted by Ministers and Laymen conjointly

is entered upon.

III. The deliberations of the Conterence, when consisting of Ministers and Laymen, shall be confined to the only-appointed Members of that Conference; but any Minister permitted by the District Committee to attend the Conference when composed of Ministers only, may be present during the Sessions of the Conference when composed of Ministers and Laymen; and the Lay Members of Connexional Committees may be present during the proceedings of the Conference when composed of Ministers and Laymen. Seats for the purpose shall be reserved for Ministers and Laymen.

The admission of any other persons shall be determined and arranged according to circumstances, at the discretion of the

Conference.

IV. The following subjects shall remain within the exclusive province of the Conference when consisting of Ministers only, viz:—

(i.) The formal constitution of the Conference: Filling up of vacancies in the Legal Conference: Election of the President and Secretary: And the appointment of other Officers of the Conference.

- (ii.) Ministerial Lists: Admission and Continuance of Preachers on Trial: Arrangements for the Examination of Candidates and of Preachers on Trial: Admission into Full Connexion, and Ordination.
- (iii.) All Questions affecting Ministerial Character and Ability, and of Discipline arising thereupon, or in any wise relating thereto.
- (iv.) All Final Appeals in matters of Discipline relating either to Ministers or Members.
- (v.) Ministers becoming Supernumeraries; Supernumeraries returning to the Work.
- (vi.) Obituaries.
- (vii.) Stations: and all Appointments of Ministers.
- (viii.) Pastoral consideration of the Number and State of the Societies, and Pastoral Address.
- (ix.) Pastoral Reports: Kingswood and Woodhouse-Grove School, Clapton and Southport Schools, Sheffield and Taunton Colleges, the Leys School, Cambridge, and any similar Institution.
- (x.) Supervision of Connexional Literature.
- (xi.) Reception of Addresses, and Preparation and Adoption of Replies.
- (xii.) Official Appointments, Deputations, and Delegations.
- (xiii.) Conduct of Public Worship, in accordance with the rules and usages of the Connexion.
- (xiv.) Time and Place of holding the next Conference, and the Order of its Business.
- (xv.) And all Ministerial and Pastoral subjects of like nature with any of those specified in this Resolution, or affecting the Ministerial or Pastoral Supervision of the Connexion.
- N.B.—It is understood that the Management of the Book-Room remains as at present.
- V. The following subjects shall come within the province of the Conference when consisting of Ministers and Lay Representatives, viz:—The business now classed in the printed Minutes of the Conference, under the several heads of—
 - (i.) Committees of Privileges and Exigency.
 - (ii.) Missions (Foreign).

(vii.) The Worn-out Ministers' and Ministers' Widows' Auxiliary Fund.

(viii.) The Wesleyan Theological Institution.

(ix.) Education: The (a) General Committee; (b) Connexional Sunday-School Union; (c) Children's Home.

(x.) Higher Education.

(xi.) Religious Observance of the Lord's Day.
(xii.) Extension of Methodism in Great Britain.

(xiii.) Temperance.

And also all questions relating to-

(xiv.) District Sustentation Funds.

(xv.) Proposed alterations and Divisions of Circuits or

Districts against which there is any Appeal.

N.B.—The Conference when consisting of Ministers only shall have power to consider and decide all questions as to alterations and divisions of Circuits or Districts on which the Quarterly Meetings and District Committees shall be agreed, and against which there is no Appeal; and also all propositions for the calling out of additional Ministers which shall have received the sanction of the Home-Mission Committee.

(xvi.) And all financial and general subjects of like nature, with any of those specified in this Resolution, or affecting the financial or general affairs of the Connexion.

But all matters connected with, or arising out of, the consideration or decision of the subjects specified in this Resolution, which in the foregoing Resolution are stated to be within the province of the Conference when consisting of Ministers only, shall be considered and decided accordingly. VI. The consideration and determination of all questions raised by any Resolutions of District Committees, or by Memorials from Circuit Quarterly Meetings, or otherwise, shall come within the province of the Conference when exclusively Ministerial, or when the Lay Representatives shall be present, according to the subject-matter thereof respectively. In all cases in which there may be any doubt as to the province to which a

matter belongs, the President shall decide.

VII. No new law on any subject within the province of the Conference when composed of Ministers only, proposed during any Conference, shall come into force until it shall have been submitted to the District Committees, when Ministers only are present, and until their reports, if any, shall have been considered, and such law shall have been confirmed by the next Conference when so composed; and no new law on any subject within the province of the Conference when composed both of Ministers and Lay Representatives, proposed during any Conference, shall come into force until it shall have been submitted to the District Committees, when Laymen are present, and until their reports, if any, shall have been considered, and such law shall have been confirmed by the next Conference when so composed.

N.B.—Nothing in this Resolution shall be so construed as to interfere with the rights of the Circuit Quarterly Meetings as set forth in the Minutes of Conference, 1797, vol. i. New Edition,

p. 393, and 1852, vol. xii., p. 117.

APPENDIX VII.

ELECTION OF LAY REPRESENTATIVES BY THE CONFERENCE.

1. That the voting list of persons nominated shall contain only the names of persons whose nomination is supported by six members of the Conference.

2. That a Committee of six scrutineers be appointed.

3. That for the purposes of the nomination a paper shall be prepared and distributed which will provide for the following entries to be made in it without declaring aloud in the Conference the names of the persons nominated:—

(i.) The name of the person nominated.

(ii.) The name of the person nominating.
(iii.) The names of six persons who support the nomination.
[N.B.—The names of these supporters are to be obtained by

the persons nominating.]

4. That these nomination papers be collected by the scrutineers; and that from papers which have been duly filled up, they shall prepare a voting-sheet to be printed after the manuscript has been read in the Conference.

5 That the manuscript shall supply the names of both the persons nominated and persons nominating them, but not the names of the persons supporting the several nominations.

6. That the printed voting-papers shall contain only the

names of the persons nominated.

7. That the scrutineers shall reject every voting-paper upon

which more than six names are marked for election.

8. That the six persons who have received the highest number of votes shall be declared to have been elected.

N.B.—The Resolutions of the Conference of 1880 are modified as above, in accordance with the decision of the last Conference.

APPENDIX VIII.

ABSTRACT OF THE REPORT OF THE TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE TO THE CONFERENCE OF 1883.

This year the returns indicate an unprecedented growth. The thirty-five Districts of Great Britain report a total of 2,644 Bands of Hope, with 271,700 enrolled members, an increase during the year of 299 Bands of Hope, and of 46,540 enrolled members. The fact that the Sunday-School Union reports 841,951 Sunday scholars in connection with our Churches, indicates that much has yet to be done before all our boys and girls enjoy the special and greatly-needed protection of total abstinence. It is also a matter for regret that so many of our Bands of Hope have not yet adopted the rules suggested by the Conference. Many of our Bands of Hope seem also to be unaware that we now have a Temperance Hymn-Book and Temperance Declaration Cards of our own, and that these and all other Band of Hope requisites can be obtained from the Conference Office or the Connexional Sunday-School Union.

We report this year 321 Temperance Societies, with 28,414 enrolled members, an increase during the twelve months of 144 Societies, and 17,502 members. The enrolment of boys and Girls in our Bands of Hope will often prove a temporary and delusive gain unless we secure the intelligent and Christian

sympathy of their parents.

The great work of your Committee during the last year has been to prepare, under the impulse of the President of the Conference (the Rev. Charles Garrett), a gigantic Methodist Petition in favour of Sunday Closing in England. As Scotland and Wales already enjoy that inestimable boon, the Scotch and Welsh Circuits, although eager to participate, were not requested to sign the Petition. We subjoin the number of signatures from each District, with the proportion of the signatures to the number of members of Society:—

Some additional signatures have since been received, and the official returns of the House of Commons declare that 596,877 names were appended to the Weslevan-Methodist Petition. This is decisive of the practical unanimity of Methodism in: demanding a public boon which Parliament still withholds fron. the people of England. The thanks of the Connexion are due to the Central Association for the closing of public-houses on Sunday, who generously provided the Petition-sheets required for this vast undertaking, to the District Secretaries, to the Superintendents of Circuits and others who took charge of the local sheets, and especially to the Rev. Robert Culley, who undertook the gigantic task of collecting and preparing the Petition for presentation.

Your Committee have to report that Temperance Sunday was more widely observed than in any previous year. This was largely due to the increasing energy of District Temperance

Secretaries, and District Temperance Committees.

APPENDIX 1X.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE WESLEYAN-METHODIST THANKSGIVING FUND,

PRESENTED TO THE CONFERENCE OF 1883.

THE Executive Committee have made every practicable effort to give effect to the Resolutions adopted by the Conference of 1882. They have, however, to report that their efforts have not been entirely successful.

Up to the date of this Report the accounts of twelve Districts have been completed and closed, as follows:—The Second London; Kent; Norwich and Lynn; Channel Islands; Exeter; North Wales; York; Whitby and Darlington; Newcastle; Carlisle; Isle of Man; and Zetland. From the Circuits within each of the Districts named statements have been re-

ceived which accord with a general statement that has been supplied by each District Treasurer, respectively. majority of the Districts of the Connexion such completed and corresponding statements have not yet been obtained. The Committee have reason to believe that the accounts of several Districts await completion only while a few amounts, promised in perhaps not more than one or two Circuits within those Districts, remain undetermined. The Committee expect that these cases will be settled very shortly, but meanwhile the large accounts of the Districts concerned necessarily remain open. The utmost effort has been made to obtain from every Circuit a statement showing the amount of subscriptions paid in it, and of local expenses incurred, together with the precise sum which has been remitted by the Circuit to the District Treasurers. But, as yet, in certain cases, the Committee have not been able to obtain the requisite information. The Committee will remit no exertion which may yet be necessary to secure from every Circuit in the Connexion returns which shall be complete and accurate.

The Committee have borne in mind the Resolution of the last Conference that the Fund should be closed on December 31st, 1882. They have, accordingly, made no effort to obtain additional subscriptions after that date. Still, they have not deemed it to be their duty to decline to receive subscriptions subsequently offered. Since the close of the last year the Treasurers have received, up to July 3rd inclusive, £7,200 11s., but much of this amount had been promised before the end of 1882.

It has not been found expedient to begin to print Circuit or District Lists until these can be proceeded with in the order of the Minutes of Conference, but preparations which will greatly facilitate printing have already been made, and the Lists will be printed as rapidly as possible when circumstances permit.

An ad interim Balance-sheet is presented herewith, but it will not be possible to prepare a Balance-sheet of the Fund until completed statements are received from all the Districts. The Committee will be able to proceed with the compilation and the issue of the Report of the Fund when the material necessary for the preparation of the Balance-sheet has been received; and they trust that the Conference will empower them to issue the Report as soon as it is ready. The Committee

will, of course, report formally and with precision respecting the entire Fund as soon as they are able to do so, but they trust that the Conference will not require the presentation to itself of the Report of the Fund before it is printed. The Committee hope that the Conference will meanwhile accept and regard as sufficient and satisfactory the subjoined Statement:—

The Executive Committee report—

- 1. That up to July 3rd, 1883, there has been paid to the General Treasurers—Circuit and District expenses incurred locally having been deducted—the sum of £291,721 7s. 4d., besides interest received from the City Bank. In the judgment of the Executive Committee this result is very satisfactory, for it shows that the amount of the Fund will not be reduced, by non-payment of subscriptions promised, to such an extent as might reasonably have been apprehended.
- 2. That since the last Conference the following grants have been paid:—Towards the establishment of the Princess Alice Orphanage, the sum of £5,071 6s. 7d. (including interest £168 6s. 7d.), being the balance of the grant of £19,000 (including the gift of Mr. Jevons), made by the Conference of 1879 (Min., p. 271); to the Wesleyan Missionary Society, £2,518 14s., besides £37 18s. 11d. of the amount contributed in the Foreign Districts; to the Theological Institution Fund, £1,050; and to the Schools' Fund, £700.
- The three sums last named complete the payment of fourfifths of the several amounts granted by the Conference of
 1880 to the Funds named. (Minutes, p. 246, Resolution
 III.) When the Committee reported to the last Conference,
 they feared that the resources of the Fund would not permit the payment of a larger pro ratā proportion of the
 amounts granted as above than the four-fifths; but the
 money which they have now in hand encourages a hope that
 after all other claims upon the Fund are met, a balance—
 though it cannot be large—may be available for pro ratā
 distribution between the three Funds mentioned above.
- 3. That in accordance with the Resolution of the Conference (Min. 1880, IV., pp. 246, 247), the sum of £884 11s. 5d. has been paid towards the erection of a Chapel for the Welsh in London. The Committee await the completion of the accounts of the South Wales District to enable them to ascertain and to pay the precise sum which may be due under the Resolution mentioned.


