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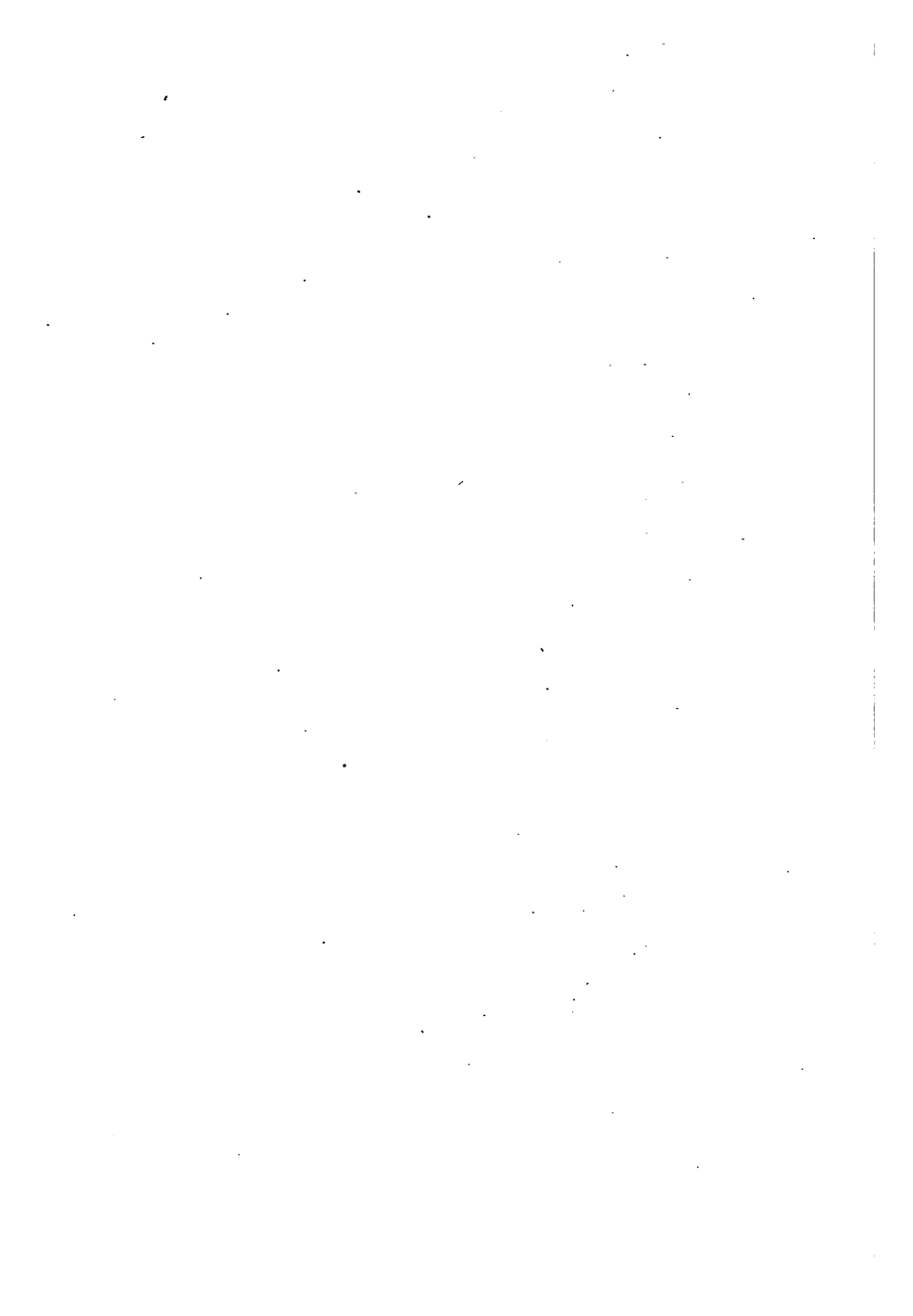

THE Yearly Conference of the People called Methodists, in the Connexion established by the late Rev. John Wesley, A.M., assembled in Newcastle-on-Tyne, on Tuesday, July 21st, 1885, and concluded its sittings on Friday, August 7th, 1885.

The number of the Legal Conference was completed by the election of Edward Watson, William Hirst, and John Henning, in the place of John Farrar, Charles Carter, and William G. Campbell, D.D., deceased.

The REV. RICHARD ROBERTS was elected President of the Conference, and the REV. ROBERT NEWTON YOUNG, D.D., was elected Secretary.

The following Supernumerary Ministers, Hugh Jones (A), Joseph Binns, James Cooke (A), John Lyth, D.D., John Hearnshaw, and Thomas B. 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Q. VI. What Ministers have DIED since the last Conference ?

A. 1. In *Great Britain*, thirty, viz,—

(1.) SAMUEL WILSON ; who was born at New Bolingbroke, Lincolnshire, in 1846, and died at Nantwich, August 11th, 1884. He entered the Ministry in 1873. He was a man of very devout spirit and of great fidelity in every department of the work of a Christian Minister. He was greatly beloved by all in the various Circuits in which he laboured. His ministry was intelligent, practical and intensely earnest. Christ was his great theme.

(2.) JOHN HUGH BEECH ; who was born in Hereford in 1816, and died at Sheffield, August 12th, 1884. He was the son of the Rev. Hugh Beech, and had the benefit of a truly Christian parentage. He early felt the drawings of the Spirit, and at fourteen years of age was led to decision. Shortly afterwards he began to preach, and in his twentieth year was sent to the Huddersfield Circuit. During forty subsequent years he occupied some of the most important Circuits in the Connexion, returning to some of them for a second term of service, and in several districts filled the office of Chairman. In all his Circuits God gave him visible fruit of his labours, in some he rejoiced over considerable revivals. His sermons were lucid in arrangement, felicitous in the blending of doctrinal and practical instruction, and studiously evangelical. He had a well-stored mind, a solid judgment, a keen insight into character, and a rich vein of kindly humour, which lent a singular charm to his public addresses and private intercourse. His writings reveal broad sympathies and a shrewd estimate of passing events. Above all, he was a man of pure heart, of courageous fidelity to conviction and of deep humility. His closing years were chastened with fiery trials, borne with Christian fortitude. The last illness was brief, affording little opportunity for any dying testimony. A sudden seizure of paralysis found all his affairs

in perfect order. In the intervals of consciousness he was calmly confident, and after lingering a few days he exchanged mortality for life in the sixty-eighth year of his age, and the forty-seventh of his ministry.

(3.) JOHN VANES; who was born at Dudley, in 1813, and died at Baling, Middlesex, August the 15th, 1884, in the seventy-first year of his age, having just completed the forty-eighth year of his ministry. Brought up in a Christian home, before the age of fifteen he gave his heart to God, and his hand to His people. He was accepted as a candidate for the Ministry in 1836. He laboured in Circuit work for forty-three years, leaving everywhere the memory of a good Minister of Jesus Christ. For five years he waited in retirement his summons to the home above.

Mr. Vanes was manly in appearance and in character. His nature was most frank and kindly. As a preacher he was vigorous, earnest and impressive; his sermons were experimental and practical, full of evangelical truth and unction, and were greatly enriched from his acquaintance with the older English theology. He cared for every detail of Circuit work, and paid particular and tender attention to the young, the aged and the afflicted. As a colleague he was most affectionate and considerate, and as a Chairman of a District his conduct was marked by firmness and courtesy. In his last illness he was kept in perfect peace, calmly confident in the mercy of God in Christ.

(4.) RICHARD ELAND; who was born at Huntingdon, 1822. He was the son of the late Rev. Richard Eland. When a boy at Woodhouse Grove, he obtained a sense of 'peace with God, through our Lord Jesus Christ.' He early began to preach, and was one of the first students in Richmond College, in 1843. His sermons were clear and vigorous forthsettings of evangelical truth. Possessed of remarkable bodily vigour he was 'in labours more abundant.' Whether in the more spiritual work of the Ministry, or in the manifold cares of

extensive and difficult superintendencies, he was equally diligent and faithful. The head of a large family, he 'ruled well his own house.' He was eminently 'fervent in Spirit'; and in him longsuffering was crowned with kindness. He never laid down the sickle until, after thirty-eight years of incessant toil, it dropped out of his hand. In 1883, he became a Supernumerary in the Mostyn-Road Circuit. In his retirement he worked to the full measure of his strength, and beyond it. Under great physical difficulty he preached his last sermon, at Walworth, on Sunday evening, July 20th, 1884. On August 16th, his mind was arrested and much comforted by the promise: 'To him that overcometh will I give to eat of the hidden manna,' etc. In the afternoon he fell asleep, in the sixty-third year of his age, and the fortieth of his ministry. Almost his last words were: 'All is well.'

(5.) LEWIS WILLIAMS; who was born in Liverpool in 1810. His parents being zealous members of the Society, he had a religious training. When about eighteen years of age he was converted under the ministry of the Rev. Thomas Aubrey. He soon began to preach. In 1838, he was received into the Wesleyan-Methodist Ministry, and laboured for thirty-seven years, principally in the Welsh work. In 1874, failing health compelled him to retire from the more active work, and he settled at Newport, Monmouthshire, gladly taking part as long as he was able in the work of the Church. He bore pain and prostration with true Christian patience, and found abundant support in the blessed Gospel he had delighted to preach. He was 'a good man, full of faith,' and had great power in prayer. His ministry was the means of adding hundreds of souls to the Church of Christ. He died in great peace, August 29th, 1884, in the seventy-fifth year of his age, and the forty-seventh of his ministry.

(6.) DAVID EVANS; who was born at Brynbica, near Tredegar, in 1824. Pious parents trained him 'in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.' He was converted to God when

fourteen years of age. In 1850, he was appointed to his first Circuit, and for thirty-one years pursued his ministerial work with acceptance and success. He was a diligent student of the Word of God and of Methodist theology. His sermons were characterized by sound doctrine and solid matter well arranged, and rendered interesting and instructive by apt illustrations. He was a careful Superintendent, and a firm administrator of Methodist discipline. He for several years conscientiously discharged the duties of Chairman of a District. In 1881, through failure of health, he was compelled to retire, but spent the rest of his days in such ministerial work as failing health permitted. His last illness was borne with patience and resignation. A few weeks before his death he said: 'Et is all right between me and God.' A few hours before his death he called his family round him, and after blessing each separately, passed away in peace. He died at Swansea, September 29th, 1884, in the sixtieth year of his age, and the thirty-fifth of his ministry.

(7.) JAMES CHEESWRIGHT; who was born in London in 1798. At about the age of sixteen he came under Methodist influences, and was converted to God, and shortly afterwards became a member of the Society. The reality of his conversion was evidenced by a consistent Christian life and earnest Christian work. In 1819 he was accepted as a candidate for the Ministry, and designated for Foreign Mission service. He was appointed to the island of Grenada. For eleven years he faithfully served the Missionary Society in the West Indies. Repeated attacks of fever and the hardships of mission life greatly enfeebled his health, and in 1830 he obtained permission to return. For twenty-three years he travelled in English Circuits, and loyally did the work of a Methodist Preacher. In 1853 he became a Supernumerary, residing for six years in Northampton, and for nearly twenty-six years in Bath. As long as strength availed him he continued to serve the Church by preaching, taking the leadership of a Class, and

in many other ways. The last eight or nine years of his life were years of great physical feebleness; but his hope and confidence in Christ were firm to the end. His testimony, given a little while before he passed away, was: 'I am saved'; 'He is all love.' At the age of eighty-six, and after a ministry of sixty-five years, he fell on sleep, October 7th, 1884.

(8.) JAMES SAMUEL THOMAS; was born at Wakefield, in 1816, and died on the 15th of October, 1884. He was converted to God in his fourteenth year. After being a student at Hoxton, he was appointed to a Circuit in 1839. He won the affection of the people, and gave 'full proof of his ministry.' His preaching bore evidence of careful preparation. He fulfilled the various duties of his office with fidelity and success. A long and active service was followed by a few months of comparative rest at Mexborough in the Wath Circuit. There disease closed his earthly career. His death was eminently peaceful. His last words were: 'Whatever may be the issue of this affliction, God will take care of my family. I am resting in Jesus, and trusting in His merits.'

(9.) JOHN KEIGHTLEY; who was born at Groby, Leicestershire, in 1804. His parents were Baptists; but in early life he attended Methodist services, was converted, and joined the Society. He at once became an earnest Christian worker, and in 1829 was accepted by the Conference as a probationer. His first appointment was to Sierra Leone, to which mission he volunteered to go, to fill up the vacancy occasioned by the death of his personal friend, the Rev. W. R. Peck. For nearly three years he laboured in Western Africa, and then returned to England. After travelling two years in the Peterborough Circuit he was sent to the West Indies, where he remained for nine years, doing useful service. In 1843 he came home, and from that date to the Conference of 1868 he made full proof of his ministry in the Circuits to which he was appointed.

As a friend and colleague he was kind and true; as a Superin-

tendent he was diligent and painstaking, conscientious in the fulfilment of duty, and most loyal to Methodist economy. On becoming a Supernumerary he retired to Bath, where he cheerfully rendered to Methodism all the help within his power. In the oversight of a Class and pastoral visitation, he was most devoted, and his services were greatly appreciated. For two or three years before his death the infirmities of age prevented his doing any active work in the Church, but he retained his interest in all branches of Methodist work to the last; and the Gospel which he had preached to others was his solace and his stay. He entered into rest, on the 22nd of October, 1884, in the fifty-fifth year of his ministry, and the eighty-first of his age.

(10.) JOHN FARRAR; the son of the Rev. John Farrar, sen., was born at Alnwick, July 29th, 1802. At Woodhouse-Grove School he laid the foundations of a sound and careful scholarship, and formed habits of mental discipline which distinguished him in after years. To the influence of his school days he traced his first consciousness of the love of God, and his profound attachment to Methodism and its institutions. After leaving Woodhouse Grove his religious life declined for a time; but through the ministry of his brother and the Rev. John Storry, he recovered the ground which he had lost.

In 1822 he entered the Ministry, and during the four years of his probation he served as second Master at Woodhouse Grove.

In all the spheres of his itinerant labours during thirteen years, the memory of his Circuit ministry is precious. He was appointed Governor and Tutor of the Abney House branch of the Theological Institution in 1839, and Classical Tutor at Richmond in 1843. After fourteen years of service in this office, and an interval of one year in the City-Road Circuit, he became Governor of Woodhouse-Grove School. In 1868 he was appointed Governor of the Headingley branch of the Theological Institution. In 1877 he retired from the active work of the Ministry, and spent his remaining years in honoured and well-

earned rest, in its spirit and example as fruitful as his years of toil.

For nine years he acted as Financial Secretary, and for twenty years as Chairman of a District. Fourteen times he was chosen Secretary of the Conference, and was twice elected President. These honours were well worn. On his attaining the jubilee of his ministry, the District Meeting over which he had presided for many years presented him with an address, in which he was truly described as possessing 'the virtues of a Christian, the accomplishments of a scholar, the manners of a gentleman, the tranquillity of a well-ordered mind, and the sagacity of an able administrator.'

Endowed with superior natural gifts, Mr. Farrar gained his high position by their conscientious culture. He owed his success in every department to his unwearied industry in the utilization of those gifts. He was a studious reader, and an admirable compiler. He did much to foster in Methodism a taste for Biblical Literature by his dictionaries, which still have a special value.

His preaching was distinguished by clearness and simplicity, by sobriety of thought, and by an all-pervasive dignity and fervour which made his teaching peculiarly impressive. Whilst thoroughly appreciating the forcefulness of his mother tongue, he illumined his theme now and then with beautiful classic citation. A true Barnabas, he was no less a 'son of thunder.' And while his ministry was prized by the cultivated and thoughtful, 'the common people heard him gladly.'

Admirable as were his methods as a Governor and Tutor, his personal influence and example had even more to do with the moulding of the character of those who were entrusted to his care. His courtesy, high sense of honour, patience and tender sympathy, won for him the admiration and confidence of all. Rigid in the maintenance of discipline, his rule was one of love and honour. From the School with which he was associated as Governor and Master for fourteen years, and from the Theological Institutions in which he held office for twenty-

seven years, hundreds, who 'hold him in high honour,' have gone forth into various spheres of public life.

His administration in the several responsible offices which he held in the Connexion was wise, courteous and conciliatory. His conscientious discharge of all his functions won for him the confidence of his brethren. His thorough acquaintance with the economy of Methodism, together with his remarkable discreetness and sagacity, gave special value to his counsels. His modest reticence was proverbial. Though jealous of legislative changes, he loyally carried out the policy which his brethren adopted.

His bearing was grave and dignified, yet genial. Little children instinctively yielded to him their confidence and affection. Nowhere was his character seen to such advantage as within his own home.

The seven years of his retirement were years of increasing infirmity and suffering; yet he never murmured. 'Mine,' he would often say, 'has been a life of mercy.' He frequently said, sadly smiling: 'My company before is gone.' In the midst of physical and mental depression his cheerfulness and brightness of spirit would often assert itself, and his courtesy, thoughtfulness and sweetness of temper never forsook him. The words of the text of his trial sermon recurred to him frequently in his last hours: 'Return unto thy rest; O my soul; for the Lord hath dealt bountifully with thee.' On the 19th of November, 1864, in the eighty-third year of his age, he gently fell asleep.

(11.) JOHN HERBERT; who was born near Borth, Cardigan-shire, in 1816. He was led in his youth to attend the Methodist chapel, and was there converted to God. He manifested a remarkable faithfulness in attendance upon all the means of grace, and proved of much service to the cause in that place in 'the day of small things.' He commenced his ministry at Dolgelly in 1844, and laboured with much acceptance in the North and South Wales Districts, where his

memory is tenderly cherished. His preaching was scriptural and practical. He was an excellent pastor, and fulfilled the functions of his high calling with marked fidelity. In 1873, owing to failing health, he became Supernumerary, and spent the last years of his life at Tredegar, where his services were highly appreciated. The beautiful purity and simplicity of his character has left a deep and permanent impression upon the inhabitants of the town. His zeal and activity in the work of the Lord continued unabated to the end. His last illness was very brief. He peacefully passed away, November 21st, 1884, in the sixty-ninth year of his age, and the forty-first of his ministry.

(12.) JAMES SUGDEN; who was born in 1822, at Egremont, Cumberland. His father was a Wesleyan-Methodist minister. Whilst an apprentice in Bishop Auckland, James was led, mainly through his father's influence, to give his heart to God. In 1844, he was accepted as a candidate for the Ministry, and sent to Didsbury, where he remained two years. In 1846, he was appointed to a Circuit, and for twenty-seven years laboured successfully. In 1873, he was elected to the chair of the York District. Early in the next year a slight paralytic stroke compelled him to take a year's rest, but he again entered on full Circuit work, in which he continued till 1880, when another stroke forced him into absolute retirement. His ministry was marked, above all, by evangelical fervour and soul-saving power. Few men have more consistently acted on our Founder's direction: 'You have nothing to do but to save souls; therefore spend and be spent in this work.' In every Circuit where he laboured, especially Leeds and York, he was the means of bringing many to Christ. But he did not forget to feed and tend those who were in the fold; and his exquisite sympathy gave him wonderful power in comforting the distressed. He was a deep student of the human heart, and in daily pastoral intercourse learned the secret springs of feeling which his public ministrations were successful in moving

for good. He neglected no part of his duty : was a loyal colleague, an able Superintendent, and an earnest advocate of our institutions, especially of our Foreign Missionary Society, on whose behalf his utterances glowed with a more than ordinary fire.

The greatest joy of his life was to see all his children converted to God, and two of them engaged in the ministry which was dropping from his reluctant hands. His last illness was peculiarly distressing, his mind being at times terribly clouded and depressed through disease. But he never lost his confidence in his Saviour, and repeatedly spoke of the good hope of heaven through Christ. For some months he lay speechless and almost unconscious, waiting for the Master's call, which came December 8th, 1884.

(13.) JAMES NANCE; who was born at St. Columb in 1820. He was early converted to God, and began to preach before he was seventeen years of age. From that time until his death he found his greatest delight in proclaiming 'the unsearchable riches of Christ.' In 1844 he entered our Ministry, and was one of the first students at Didsbury. As a public speaker his aim was to be easily understood, and to produce present conviction. His sermons were marked by clear and close thinking, great plainness and simplicity of speech and doctrine, vigorous appeal, and steadfast fearlessness of man. He was made very useful in bringing sinners to Christ, the work upon which he ever kept his heart, and towards which he bent all his energies. 'The common people heard him gladly.' As a pastor and administrator he was kind and firm : sound in judgment and unflinching in fairness, inspiring confidence and energy into those with whom he mingled. The plainness and integrity of his life continually enforced the truth he preached. In 1884 he retired from active work, his health having failed. His decline was speedy ; the reward followed close upon the work. He recognised the approaching end ; but never questioned the gracious purposes of God. His faith kept firm to the last ; and with the weakening of the body, the strength of the soul

became more manifest. He expressed but one desire as the end drew near, that he might preach once more. Shortly before his death he spoke of his great longing to be at home. He passed away in great peace on Sunday, January 4th, 1885.

(14.) BENJAMIN TREGASKIS; who was born at Penryn, in 1814. His parents were members of the Wesleyan-Methodist Society. He was converted to God in his nineteenth year through a dream. In 1836 he became a candidate for the Ministry, and was accepted and appointed to the West Indies. He laboured in different islands in the Antigua District until 1864, when he was appointed to take charge of the Sierra Leone and Gambia Districts. He spent ten years in this sphere of labour. He returned to England in 1875, and became a Supernumerary in London, where he died, January the 13th, 1885. He was a man of ability and energy, and discharged his ministerial duties with great diligence and conscientiousness. During his last illness he repeated frequently and with great emphasis:

‘In my hand no price I bring,
Simply to Thy cross I cling.’

He said: ‘The best have simply to trust in Christ, and I have not been the best by a long way.’ Amongst his last utterances were the words: ‘Great confidence and peace.’ He quietly passed to his reward in the seventy-first year of his age, and the forty-ninth of his ministry.

(15.) JAMES LOUTIT; was born in Lerwick, in 1801. He entered the Ministry in 1825; and after forty-two years of devoted toil in Circuit work, and eighteen years of patient waiting and service as a Supernumerary, he fell asleep at Halifax, in the eighty-fourth year of his age. His childhood and youth were darkened by the impressment of his father, after whose death he was articled as a solicitor, and was ultimately appointed Deputy Clerk of the Peace for the Zetland Isles. Under the ministry of the Rev. Daniel McAllum, M.D., Mr. Loutit obtained a true view of himself as a sinner, and when the first

missionaries came to Zetland, he heard them preach, and began to meet in Class. Shortly afterwards he obtained a sense of God's pardoning love. He was the first Wesleyan-Methodist Class-leader, Local-preacher and Minister raised up in Zetland.

He was a systematic and diligent student. He had a considerable acquaintance with the Hebrew and Greek Scriptures, and an extensive knowledge of the theology of the Reformers, Puritans and early Nonconformists.

His mind was vigorous and well stored, and his preaching was instructive, forceful and faithful. As Chairman of a District and Superintendent of a Circuit, he proved himself well skilled in our polity, and conscientious in its administration. Though occasionally stern in manner, the law of kindness and charity was deep in his heart. He was long a nursing father to our poor societies in Zetland. By self-sacrifice and varied efforts he secured means to help their necessities when fierce northern storms injured their manses and chapels, and to support the Home-Mission work there, of which he was a first fruit. When he became possessed of larger resources his liberality abounded in various directions, and at some sacrifice he declined to receive the Connexional allowances to Supernumeraries.

In the few lucid intervals which marked the end of a weary and prolonged affliction he declared his unshaken trust in the mercy of God, frequently emphasising the words: 'I know whom I have believed.' In a peaceful slumber his spirit passed to its rest, on the 18th of January, 1885.

(16.) JAMES ALDIS; who was born at Long Stratton, in the Attleborough Circuit, in 1808. His father was a lay-preacher amongst the Congregationalists; but the son, on his conversion, joined the Methodist Society, when about twenty-two years of age. In 1834 he was accepted as a candidate for the Ministry, and having offered himself for the foreign work, was appointed to Barbadoes. For five years he laboured as a missionary, when, through failure of health, he returned home, and was in ordinary work for about seven years. He loved the foreign

work, however, and returned to the West Indies, but was only able to remain there three years. He spent the rest of his life in the work at home. His preaching was evangelical, practical, and useful; and he laboured with much prayer for the salvation of souls. As a pastor he was very diligent. He was greatly beloved by all who knew him. In 1877 he became a Supernumerary, but in retirement he spent a large portion of his time in visiting the sick and the aged. His last illness was unexpected and severe, but he had the assurance of hope to the end. Two days before his departure, he said: 'There is no death; Christ has abolished death; bless His holy name for ever!' He suffered without a murmur, and died without fear, January 22nd, 1885, in the seventy-seventh year of his age, and the fifty-first of his ministry.

(17.) JONATHAN BARROWCLOUGH; who was born at Wooldale, near Holmfirth, in 1801. When about fourteen years of age he found peace with God, and thenceforward steadfastly followed Christ. He early began to preach, and in 1825 was admitted into the Ministry. For forty-seven years he was a diligent pastor and teacher, enduring much hardness, both physical and financial, for the sake of the Gospel. His preaching was eminently scriptural, practical, and earnest. He was a man of much prayer and deep regard for the Sabbath. He was a painstaking Superintendent, and extremely conscientious. During twelve years of Supernumerary life he suffered much at times from nervous depression, but at others gave himself to his Master's work. In Louth he was favoured with remarkable health, which he joyfully expended in the service of the Circuit. There, after a week's illness, he fell asleep, January 30th, 1885, having testified: 'Christ is my Light, Christ is my Life, Christ is my Pattern. All is calm, and joy and peace.'

(18.) JOHN WESLEY DAWSON; who was born at Faversham, in 1816. He was accepted for the Ministry in 1838, and spent two years in our Institution at Hoxton. In all his Circuits, God

greatly crowned his preaching, and in some of them gracious revivals of religion were vouchsafed. His preaching was plain, Scriptural, practical and eminently persuasive; his power as a preacher being enhanced by the clear and pathetic tones of a rich musical voice. In pastoral work he was very successful; and his naturally tender and sympathetic disposition had been developed by the deep and distressing affliction which was never absent from his own home: chastened, as few are, he was able to weep with those that wept, to the abounding comfort of many. In his fifty-third year his health, never robust, so far gave way that he was compelled to relinquish the full work of the Ministry. He, however, continued, as his strength permitted, both to preach and to conduct Society-classes. On Sunday, February 15th, 1885, he was suddenly summoned to the presence of his Lord, in the sixty-ninth year of his age, and the forty-sixth of his ministry. His last words were: 'What time I am afraid, I will trust in Thee.'

(19.) THOMAS LEACH; who was born at Southampton, in 1815. He was brought up under the ministry of the Established Church; but was brought into connection with the Methodists of the Isle of Wight. For thirty-nine years he laboured in some of our country Circuits, and in all he approved himself as a minister of Christ. In 1882, he was appointed minister to the forces at Shorncliffe Camp, but shortly afterwards was smitten with paralysis, and for nearly three years he lingered in extreme weakness. He died at Hythe, February 27th, 1885. His personal character stood very high. He was noble, transparent, unselfish and confiding. His private life was an example of cheerful piety and affectionate thoughtfulness. His power in prayer was very remarkable. His preaching was eminently practical and simple. He was attentive, judicious and sympathising. As a Superintendent, he was calm, wise and prudent; and in critical times showed great dignity and ability. His honour was always worthy of reliance, and his judgment of confidence. He 'walked with God.'

(20.) **THEOPHILUS S. GREGORY**; who was born at New Buckenham, in 1825. He was the second son of the Rev. Benjamin Gregory, senr. He was educated at Woodhouse-Grove School, where he was converted to God; but, after a while, fell from grace. At the age of seventeen, however, he decidedly chose the good part, and forthwith began to labour earnestly in the Lord's vineyard. In 1849, he was recommended by the Manchester (Oxford-Road) Circuit as a candidate for the Ministry, and accepted by the Conference. After labouring for some months in the Bingham Circuit, he was appointed, in 1850, to the West Indies, as his heart was set on Mission-work. He arrived on the field at a critical period in the history of West Indian Missions, when the fully emancipated negroes had to be trained to freedom. He threw himself into his work with ardour, tempered by sagacity. He evinced deep interest in and sympathy with his newly-liberated charge; and he fed them according to the integrity of his heart, and guided them by the skilfulness of his hands. He won the warm affection of his simple-hearted people. A brother missionary writes: 'The tidings of his death will make tears run down many black faces.' Whilst in Demerara he paid great attention to the Coolies and the aboriginal Indians. In 1865, after fifteen years devoted labour in the tropics, he returned to England, and gave himself up to Circuit work with marked diligence, faithfulness and serviceability. His preaching was thoughtful, fresh, individual, animated and earnest. But he shone most in the house of mourning, and in the administration of a Circuit. His sound, practical sense, his judiciousness and tact, his perfect self-command, his geniality, and, above all, his simplicity, single-mindedness and unflagging assiduity, specially fitted him for superintendency. His mind was strong and graceful, and he had considerable literary taste and skill; but his engrossment in his work left him little time for the gratification of the one, or the display of the other. He dwelt amongst and lived for his own people, who felt they were his own.

His fatal illness was long, sharp and testing. In his last

Circuit he was permitted but a few months of toil; but these sufficed to draw from his people a love like that which the first believers showed to the first preachers of the truth. He died as he had lived, like 'a good soldier of Jesus Christ,' on March 14th, 1885, in the sixtieth year of his age, and the thirty-sixth of his ministry.

(21.) JOSEPH FLOYD; who was born at Stourbridge in 1800 His parents were members of the Established Church; the son regularly accompanied them to its services; but until about fifteen years of age he knew nothing of experimental religion. He then began to attend Methodist Services, and a few months afterwards joined the Society, and became soundly converted. Before he was twenty years of age he was appointed leader of three classes. In 1824 he commenced a ministerial career of unusual length, constant fidelity, and much success. He was very systematic and thorough in pastoral work. His preaching was plain, earnest, and practical; and having a burning zeal for souls, his ministry resulted in many conversions. During troublous times, as a Superintendent, he was judicious, loving, and firm. His home proved a good nursery for our Church. On his retirement he spent a happy, useful eventide at Diss, where he gently fell asleep on March 16th, 1885, having at the time been longer in the Ministry than any of his brethren.

(22.) JOSEPH CROSSLEY WOODCOCK; who was born in 1840, in the Holmfirth Circuit, of Methodist parentage. In his fourteenth year he was converted to God, and became a member of the Society. At seventeen years of age he began to preach, and two years later was accepted as a candidate for the Ministry. His preaching, marked by clearness of thought and directness of appeal, was pre-eminently evangelical. A devout student of Holy Scripture, his discourses were enriched by careful exposition and mature counsels, giving to his ministry remarkable interest and power. Possessed of a sound judgment and business aptitude, with a courteous and genial bearing, he was

peculiarly fitted for the positions of trust to which his brethren called him. As secretary of some of the most important districts of the Connexion, and of several Connexional committees, he rendered valuable service, and was in great things and small, painstaking and conscientious. He took a large-hearted interest in whatever concerned the universal Church; kept himself abreast of the great movements of the age in relation to it; and assisted on the platform and through the press in the creation of a wholesome public opinion. He revealed a character of singular purity and tenderness. His day closed whilst it was yet noon. An insidious disease, from which he had suffered for months, developed at last with startling rapidity. During a period of consciousness he quietly passed away on March 17th, 1885, in the forty-fifth year of his age, and the twenty-fourth of his ministry.

(23.) **GEORGE SAVERY**; who was born at Devonport, on December 13th, 1815. His widowed mother trained him faithfully in the way of the Lord, and at the age of fourteen he was converted to God. In 1838, he was accepted as a candidate for the Ministry, and went to the Theological Institution at Hoxton. After three years of English Circuit work he was sent to the West Indies, where he laboured for eight years. On his return to this country he was engaged for thirty-one years on the Home-work. He gained the affection of all by his genial disposition and his warm, social sympathy; and these qualities contributed to the furtherance of his pastoral work. His unremitting diligence in the study of the Word of God showed itself in the clear exposition which always marked his preaching; while he faithfully, successfully and earnestly pleaded with men on behalf of God. His sermons were full and varied in their matter, and were delivered with genuine vigour and warmth.

In 1881, he retired to Oxford, where, to the full measure of his strength, he rendered valuable help as a Preacher, a Class-leader, and a Missionary Advocate, gaining the respect of all,

and the warm affection of very many. The final break-up of his strength was rapid, and the end came quite suddenly, and without apparent warning, on March 21st, 1885, when he entered into rest.

(24.) WILLIAM WATSON (B.); who was born in 1838. His parents were Presbyterians. In childhood he was taken to a Wesleyan-Methodist Sabbath-school; and at the age of sixteen, being under conviction of sin, was invited to a Class-meeting, where he was enabled to trust in Christ. In 1861, he entered the Ministry, and was sent to the West Indies, where he had great success. Returning to the home work, he laboured for twenty years, and never failed to keep an appointment. In his last illness his sufferings were peculiarly severe, but his trust was unshaken. Again and again, while in agony, he whispered: 'God is Love;' and when asked: 'Do you feel that now?' he replied: 'I am sure of it!' To his absent children he sent the message: 'Tell them to be faithful unto death.' His last words were: 'Jesus, my Saviour!'

An eminently faithful servant of Christ, firm and kind, he cared especially for the sick and the poor. He was an earnest, practical, thoughtful and impressive preacher, 'rightly dividing the word of truth.' During his short residence in the Dumbarton Circuit he made many friends. At the beginning of his illness the Ministers of the various Presbyterian churches voluntarily and generously supplied his pulpit in turn for nearly three months. He died on the 25th of March, 1885, in the forty-seventh year of his age, and the twenty-fourth of his ministry.

(25.) JOHN DRAKE; who was born in Norwich in 1809. Under the godly influence of his parents he was converted to God when eighteen years of age. He entered the Ministry in 1835. After nine years' labour, chiefly in his native district, he was appointed to Scotland, where the remainder of his life, a period of forty years, was spent. He had a high appreciation of

Methodist work in Scotland, and at a period of deep discouragement to the cause there, he gave himself to it with ardour. He deliberately chose the poorest Circuits, and returned to some of them for two and even three terms of three years each. From 1849 until his retirement from the active work he sustained an official relation to the Edinburgh and Aberdeen District, and greatly promoted the establishment of the Relief and Extension Fund for Methodism in Scotland, and other special movements for the improvement of the district. He lived to see the accomplishment of some of his cherished purposes in the removal of heavy financial burdens. He was an earnest student, an extensive reader in several languages, a profound thinker, and proficient in many branches of knowledge. His preaching was earnest and practical, characterised by unflinching freshness, often by quaint and homely illustration, always by clearness of thought and distinctly evangelical purpose. As a pastor he was greatly beloved: in him the poor and afflicted found a friend, and his influence for good in many Methodist homes throughout Scotland is a cherished memory by two generations. He was eminently wise in counsel, prudent and conciliatory, and secured in a remarkable degree the love of the brethren associated with him.

In 1872 he became a Supernumerary, and took up his residence in Arbroath, where, in industrious retirement, he prosecuted his favourite studies, preached as long as he was able, and continued to evince a cheerful piety and a lively interest in everything affecting the cause of Christ. After an attack of paralysis on Easter Sunday last, life gradually ebbed away. During his affliction he maintained a childlike trust in Christ, tender thoughtfulness for others, and a calm and resigned spirit. Manifestly triumphing over death, he departed to be with Christ, May the 8th, 1885, in the seventy-seventh year of his age, and the fiftieth of his ministry.

(26.) SETH DIXON (A); who was born at Harby, near Lincoln, in 1803. His father was an honoured Class-leader, and Local-

preacher. In youth he was deeply convinced of sin. While praying in a barn he found peace, through faith in Christ.

In 1825 he began to call sinners to repentance. During the first six months he preached about eighty times, and walked three hundred miles to his appointments. His devotedness attracted the notice of the Rev. John Smith, who used him as a helper in evangelistic work, and his association with that holy man was a lifelong blessing to him. In 1829 he was placed on the President's List of Reserve. He laboured largely in Lincolnshire, and introduced Methodism into Skegness by preaching in the open air. His ministry was greatly blessed to the conversion of souls. For fifty-one years he faithfully discharged the duties of a Methodist preacher, and was never known, with one exception, to enter the pulpit after the time appointed. As a Superintendent he was painstaking and judicious, and greatly beloved both by his colleagues and the people. His sermons were most carefully prepared, earnest, practical and heart searching. During his retirement he still delighted to labour, and was composing new sermons within a short time of his death. In his last illness he was quite resigned and said :

‘ Lord, it belongs not to my care
Whether I die or live.’

He preached a funeral sermon on Sunday, March 29th, from which time he gradually declined, until, on May 15th, 1885, he fell asleep in Jesus, having nearly completed his eighty-second year.

(27.) **EBENEZER MOULTON (A)**, son of the late Rev. William Moulton ; who was born at Nottingham in the year 1809. An early and clear conversion led to self-culture and consecrated service. In 1835, he was received into the Wesleyan-Methodist Ministry, and for forty-one years continued in active work. He was firm in Methodist doctrine and polity ; was meek, gentle, loving and unselfish. His mind was well stored, and his preaching was impressive, instructive and edifying. He greatly excelled as a pastor, and won the hearts of the people

of his charge. In 1876 he retired from active work, and settled at Wetherby, where, in preaching, meeting Classes and pastoral visitation he prolonged his usefulness. His last illness was long and painful, but patience and resignation were sweetly and fully manifested. He died on the 29th of May, 1885, having borne an unblemished character for fifty years as a Wesleyan minister.

(28.) CHARLES CARTER; who was born at Baldock. He was a guileless man of unimpeachable character, of kind and genial disposition, diligent, unselfish, lowly and devout; who accomplished much by a wise concentration of his energies upon the common duties of his ministry. In the administration of his Circuits he was faithful, wise and conciliatory. The young people of his congregations were special objects of his care. By tender sympathy and by thoughtful interest in their pursuits, even their pastimes, he gently drew the feet of many into the way of peace. Many homes to-day show the good fruits of his friendly and faithful service. Ever bright himself, he diffused brightness wherever he went, making many a sad heart glad. His ministry was very useful, especially to the young and the sorrowful. He strove to honour his Master, and was rewarded by being the instrument of turning many to righteousness. After two years of suffering, meekly borne, he died at Grimsby, on the 7th of July, 1885, in the seventy-second year of his age, and the forty-eighth of his ministry.

(29.) JOSEPH WHITEHEAD; who was born at Otley in 1813. From a child the fear of God was before his eyes. When about nineteen years of age he was deeply convinced of sin, obtained mercy, and became a member of the Wesleyan-Methodist Society. In 1839, he was appointed to the Patrington Circuit. He was a man of great simplicity and of a blameless character, a successful evangelist and a diligent pastor. He was a good man, full of the spirit of his Master, of strict integrity and much tender-

ness. In 1868, he became a Supernumerary, and settled at New Wandsworth, where he did all in his power for the cause of Christ, and endeared himself to all who knew him. His interest in the prosperity of the Church he loved never abated. During his last illness he was supremely happy. He fell asleep in Jesus, on July 8th, 1885, aged seventy-two.

(30.) THOMAS ALEXANDER RAYNER; who was born in Sheffield, in 1814. He was led to the Saviour when fifteen years of age, and joined our Society in Islington, London. He was appointed to his first Circuit in 1835. For forty-five years he exercised a faithful and laborious ministry, and retired in 1880, taking up his abode in the Preston (Wesley) Circuit. He was characterised by deep and unaffected piety, a calmly fervent zeal, unbending integrity, the very soul of honour, great sensitiveness, delicacy of feeling, devotion of spirit, and a godly jealousy over himself which made conscience of the smallest of his duties. His joy was in doing the work to which he believed God had called him. As a preacher, he aimed at a clear and edifying exposition of the Word of truth. As a Superintendent, he was greatly successful in promoting the solid advancement of the Circuits in which he laboured, often inaugurating large schemes for the extension of the work of God. He had a wide and accurate acquaintance with our ecclesiastical system, and in the office of Chairman of a District, to which he had the honour of being raised very early in his ministry, he was eminently judicious, uniting firmness in the administration of discipline with kindness and geniality. He took a large-hearted interest in the prosperity of all the Churches of Christ. He was greatly loved and revered by those among whom he laboured. After becoming a Supernumerary he continued for some time to preach and visit and to meet a Society-class. The Lord led him gently to the rest that remaineth. He 'fell on sleep,' July 20th, 1885, in the seventy-second year of his age, and the fiftieth of his ministry.

2. In *Ireland, five, viz.,—*

(1.) ROBERT MAGOWAN, of the Armagh Circuit; who was born of godly Methodist parents, near the city of Armagh, on the 7th of May, 1801. He was converted to God in his father's house, during family worship, in his eighteenth year. In 1827, he was received into the Ministry of the late Primitive Wesleyan Society. He faithfully laboured on several Circuits in the full work of the Ministry; but, owing to feeble health, he spent a number of years as a Supernumerary, in which capacity he frequently preached, and in other ways sought to promote the work of God. During his last illness he continued unhesitatingly to declare his sense of eternal safety through faith in the work of Christ. A text he often quoted was: 'The blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanseth us from all sin.' He delighted in Wesley's hymns, especially that one beginning with:

'None is like Jeshurun's God.'

He fell asleep in Jesus, on July 15th, 1884, in the eighty-fourth year of his age, and the fifty-eighth of his ministry.

(2.) GEORGE KIRKPATRICK, of the Springfield Circuit; who was born at Moynaght, Clabby, co. Fermanagh, in the year 1831. His parents were devoted Methodists, and carefully trained their children in the great verities of our holy religion. In early life he was led into the enjoyment of God's forgiving love and sanctifying grace. In 1856 he was appointed to a Circuit, where he was greatly acknowledged of God, in bringing many souls to Christ. He laboured with great acceptance and success on several of our most laborious Circuits, and part of the time on the General Mission. On his last Sabbath on earth, October 19th, 1884, he preached in the morning in Derrygonelly, with even more than his wonted fervour and power. In the afternoon, in Springfield, while preaching a special sermon to the young, he grew faint, and was removed to his own bedroom, where, on the following Friday night, in the fifty-fifth year of his age, and twenty-ninth of his ministry, he

passed gently away to be 'for ever with the Lord.' He was an earnest, useful and practical preacher ; a most thoughtful and diligent pastor, who paid special attention to the sick and the young.

(3.) WILLIAM GRAHAM CAMPBELL, D.D. ; who was born near Sligo, in 1805. He was a grand-nephew of the Rev. Charles Graham, the well-known and very successful Irish Methodist Missionary. During a visit of Mr. Ouseley he received great spiritual good ; and in 1822, at a field meeting, he obtained a clear evidence of acceptance with God.

The death of Charles Graham made a deep impression upon his mind, and led him to resolve that, if possible, he would follow in his steps and become an evangelist among his countrymen. His first appointment was to the Killeshandra Circuit in the year 1831, and then began a career which, extending over more than half a century, was notable in the history of Irish Methodism for its quenchless zeal, untiring diligence, whole-hearted devotion and blessed fruitfulness. From the first, Brother Campbell acquired the character of a stirring revivalist, and that character he retained till the end. Whether he was a Circuit Preacher or a General Missionary, he did 'the work of an evangelist.' His preaching aimed at immediate results ; and it was the very joy of his heart, in the special prayer-meeting, which generally followed, to see penitent seekers of salvation crowd to the Communion-rails, or to some prepared place, in answer to his urgent and persistent appeals for instant decision.

Twenty-five years of his life were spent in the work of the General Mission. This work was his passion. Fired by the examples of Ouseley and Graham, he coveted nothing so much as the wide field and the varied opportunities which this work gave for setting forth Christ to his countrymen. He was 'instant in season, out of season.' In the field, the marketplace, the town thoroughfare, or by the country wayside, wherever he could find a congregation there he preached. This sometimes brought him into peril ; but he counted not his life

dear unto himself, if he might 'testify the Gospel of the grace of God.'

William Graham Campbell was amiable, kind, sympathetic, benevolent, and unselfish. His experience was joyous; his evidence of acceptance with God was clear; his faith was strong and his spirit very devotional. As a preacher, he was lively and earnest, tender and persuasive; setting forth the peril of sinners, not in a harsh, but in a loving spirit; and exhibiting the wondrous grace of the Saviour with great pathos and power. He had a great shrinking from the idea of any cessation or abridgment of his labours. He wished to lay down his charge only when he should lay down his body. He had his wish. For some months he had been laid aside as the result of an accident, but he seemed fairly recovered, and was about entering upon what he termed a new campaign, when the Master said: 'It is enough; come up hither.' No time was allowed for parting words or dying testimony; but none were needed to enable us with the eye of faith to see him rise to the presence of his adorable Saviour. On the evening of February 24th, 1885, he conducted a prayer-meeting with great earnestness in the Frederick-Street Church, Belfast, two hours after which he quietly breathed his soul to God, in the Methodist College, in the eightieth year of his age, and the fifty-fourth of his ministry.

(4.) JOHN M'ILROY; who was born in Drummullen, co. Derry, in 1801. His father was a very intelligent Class-leader and Local-preacher. His mother paid strict attention to the religious training of her children, and had the joy of seeing them all converted in early life. Mr. M'Ilroy received the Spirit of adoption in 1817, while partaking of the Lord's Supper. He was afterwards brought into darkness by omitting to confess Christ; but after much humiliation he was again filled with joy. Soon after he was the direct human agent in the conversion of two of his sisters. He was a great lover of the Bible. In 1836, he was accepted as a candidate by the

Primitive Wesleyan-Methodist Conference. He was thirty years in the itinerancy. He was more than once elected Chairman of a District. In 1866, failing strength led him to become a Supernumerary; he returned to the home of his youth, where he spent the remainder of his days. He spent much of his time in prayer and in meditation on things heavenly and Divine. The Minister who frequently visited him always found him happy. He sometimes spoke of wonderful revelations of Christ, which were made to him while he prayed and meditated during the night watches. He entered into rest on March 6th, 1885, in the eighty-fourth year of his age, and the forty-ninth of his ministry.

(5.) JOHN REID PORTER; who was born at Derry, in the Irvinestown Circuit. He entered our Ministry in 1850, and after nine years of faithful and acceptable service on some of our most laborious Circuits, was laid aside by a severe affliction, from which he never wholly recovered. In his preaching and pastoral habits he was most systematic, conscientious and exemplary, and had many seals to his ministry. He died at Omagh, on the 1st of June, 1885.

3. In our *Foreign Missions*, eight, viz.,—

(1.) SANTIAGO YESUDASEN; who became connected with Wesleyan-Methodism in 1874. After serving as a catechist in the southern part of the District, he came to Madras in 1883, was accepted as a Minister on trial, and laboured with acceptance and success until his death. He died in Madras, after a long and painful illness, full of faith in Christ, on June 13th, 1884.

(2.) GEORGE WILLIAM BAXTER; who was born at Deptford, in 1859, and died in Cairo, August 14th, 1884. Dedicated to God from his birth, he was a child of many prayers. In 1876, after a sermon preached by the Rev. G. K. Pryor, he, in his seventeenth year, found the pearl of great price. Feeling called to the work of the Christian Ministry, he placed himself under the direction of a senior minister, and was accepted as a candidate for the Ministry in 1878, and

designated for Foreign Mission work. In 1881, he was appointed to educational work at Lagos, West Africa. Into this work he threw himself with zeal, and speedily raised the standard of the school, and increased the number of its students. Cheerful hopefulness was a prominent trait in his character. His gentlemanly deportment, his abilities, forceful preaching and Christian graces won the affection of the people. His second unhealthy season prostrated him, and he suffered much. He had to flee to England after less than two years' service. In March 1884, he was appointed chaplain to the Wesleyan troops in Egypt. With characteristic love of souls and ambition to do his best, he undertook work beyond his strength, besides attempting much in the way of self-improvement. His letters, official and private, indicate a holy enthusiasm worthy of emulation by stronger men; and the testimonies of soldiers and civilians prove that his devotion was gratefully appreciated. On August 3rd, 1884, although suffering from fever, he preached three times. On the 14th he went into hospital, where he died.

(3.) PETER JAMES EVERS; who was born at Arcot, South India, in 1831. He had few early advantages, his father being a non-commissioned officer in a native regiment, and with his family constantly moving from place to place. When about eighteen years of age his family settled in Madras. There he joined the Society-class of the Rev. E. E. Jenkins, M.A., and by him was led to a knowledge of his Saviour. Mr. Jenkins, recognising his gifts, invited him to join a class of young men, which had been formed for Biblical and theological study. Under his guidance Mr. Evers made up the deficiencies of his early training, and formed habits of close study which he kept up to the end of life. After being employed for about two years as a teacher in the Anglo-Vernacular Institution, Royapettah, he was received as a teacher on trial by the Conference of 1853. The thirty-one years of his ministry were spent in the Madras District. He was of a remarkably calm and equable frame of mind, drawn from intercourse with God.

He was regular and methodical in his habits, and extremely careful. His sermons were plain, earnest expositions of Gospel truth, well thought out and arranged. Though at one period or other of his ministry he engaged in every form of mission work carried on in his Circuits, he was pre-eminently a pastor. He took 'heed to all the flock' over the which the Holy Ghost had made him 'overseer.' He died of cholera at Royapettah, on September 30th, 1884.

(4.) JOHANN GOTTLIEB STEINLEN; who was born at Oberurbach, in 1801, and died there on the 12th of October, 1884. In his forty-fourth year he became acquainted with the Methodists, and gave himself unto the Lord and to His people with all his heart. In 1848, he became a Local-preacher, and with gladness of heart helped Mr. Müller to the utmost of his power. In 1853, he was appointed by the Missionary Committee as Mr. Müller's coadjutor, and after the death of the latter in March, 1858, he was entrusted with the supervision of the District until the arrival of Dr. Lyth in September, 1859.

Brother Steinlen's character was most amiable. He did not live for this world. Throughout his Christian life his anxiety to speak evil of no one was remarkable: he manifested the love which 'suffereth long and is kind, envieth not, vaunteth not itself, is not puffed up, doth not behave itself unseemly, seeketh not its own, is not easily provoked, thinketh no evil,' which 'beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things, endureth all things.' All his gifts he used faithfully in the service of his Lord. He finished his course with joy.

(5.) JOHN WESLEY PHILIPS; who was born in Jaffna, Ceylon, in 1830. He was the son of one of the first Tamil ministers called out in the North Ceylon District. He was educated at the Wesleyan Central School, Jaffna, and became a teacher in that institution. As a catechist he acquitted himself so well as to be recommended for the Ministry. He was received in 1865, and laboured with much] acceptance and

success in various Circuits in the North Ceylon District until 1871, when he was sent to Colombo to begin a mission for the benefit of his fellow-countrymen in the south of the island. This proved to be the great work of his life, and is his best memorial. For thirteen years he continued his labours in Colombo, but was compelled by failing health to become a Supernumerary in 1884, when he returned to Jaffna, where he died on October 14th. He was a man of sound judgment, a diligent pastor and a faithful expounder of the Word of God. Some of his last words were: 'Christ'; 'the Cross.'

(6.) WILLIAM GEORGE MARKE; who was born at Wellington, Sierra Leone, of pious Methodist parents, liberated Africans, of the Nupe tribe, on the banks of the Niger. Though naturally of a lively disposition, he was the subject of early religious impressions, and was soundly converted to God in 1848. His earnest piety and intelligence led to his appointment as a prayer leader, in his native village, in the following year. His studious habits made him conspicuous; and he was, in 1850, sent to the Theological and Training Institution at King Tom's Point. After two years' diligent prosecution of his studies there, he was sent out as a school-master in 1853: in this capacity and that of Local-preacher he successfully laboured for many years. In 1876, he was received into the Ministry, and he laboured in four successive Circuits with much acceptance. He was conversant with the Timneh and Nupe languages, and was a gifted preacher, an intelligent scholar and a devoted Christian. The night before he died, in reply to his brother's words: 'I hope your trust is still in Christ,' he said: 'O yes!' When asked: 'Why do you trust in Christ?' he said: 'You know very well He is the anchor of my soul.' After a while he said: 'Who shall separate us from the love of Christ?' and then exclaimed:

'Jesus, Lover of my soul,

Let me to Thy bosom fly,' etc.

Without a sigh or groan, he calmly fell asleep in Jesus, in

Freetown, on December 8th, 1884, in the fifty-second year of his age, and the ninth of his ministry.

His funeral was attended by a concourse of people numbering over three thousand, including Ministers of all denominations.

(7.) EBENEZER DAWSON HEPBURN; who, in about his seventieth year, fell asleep in Jesus, at Stellenbosch, Cape of Good Hope, in April last, had the great advantage of a good home-training. In early life he yielded himself to God, and was soon moved by the Holy Ghost to enter the Christian Ministry. Having had the advantage of some nine years' study in connection with the University of Glasgow, he was ordained by the Presbytery of the Secession Church of Lanark, was sent to South Africa under the auspices of the Glasgow African Missionary Society, and was for some time engaged as the Minister of the Scottish settlers in the Bavian's River District. He felt, however, that there his energies were too exclusively demanded for purely educational work, and he meditated a return to Scotland. But one of our missionaries heard him preach a lucid and fervent sermon on 'The Witness of the Spirit,' which resulted in his entering the Ministry amongst us, in 1848. His first appointment was to Salem, where some youths were trained who have since become men of leading in the colony. There, too, as elsewhere, he rendered devoted, faithful and successful service as a pastor. While attending diligently to European work, he was always careful to look after such natives as were within his charge.

(8.) JOSEPH BELL; who was born at Kettlewell, in the Grassington Circuit, in 1853. He was converted to God at the age of twenty-two, mainly through the death of his brother, the Rev. J. Wear Bell, who died in Western Africa. He began his faithful ministry in the Portessie Circuit, in 1878. In 1879, he entered the Headingley branch of the Theological Institution. As a student he won the affectionate esteem of tutors and students. Sincere devotion to Christ was a distinguishing

feature of his character, and he was an example of holy living. Whilst preparing for English work he volunteered for service abroad. His offer was the joyous expression of his consuming desire to serve Christ where his service was most needed. He was appointed to the Wuchang District in 1882; and his brief career in China was long enough to develop many of the finest qualities of a missionary, and to make a deep impression on native Christians and the heathen. Characterised by brightness of Christian experience, he gave himself diligently to study, and soon acquired a remarkable fluency in the language of the people. At the same time he engaged heartily in dispensing medicine, and great numbers in the city of Teh-Ngan were benefited by his efforts. He loved mission work with an enthusiasm which nothing could abate. His zeal for saving souls was a holy passion. Severe illness obliged him to return to England in the spring of 1885, and he survived but a few weeks after reaching his home at Swainby. The cheerful submission to the will of God with which he approached his death, astonished all who saw him. The end came on the 5th of July, when he departed to be for ever with the Lord. He 'walked with God: and he was not; for God took him.'

DANIEL VALUPILLAI, Native Minister, Madras, died since the last District Meeting. His obituary will appear next year.

Q. VII. Are there any OBJECTIONS to any of our Ministers or Preachers on Trial?

Q. VIII. Who have CEASED TO BE RECOGNISED as Ministers amongst us?

A. George Burgess, Charles Stuart Franklin, Gustav G. Grassmück, George W. Jackson, Frederic J. Masters who has gone to California, Charles Pickels, and James W. Winspear who has gone to Australia.

Q. IX. How are our Ministers and Preachers on Trial STATIONED for the ensuing year ?

A. As follows; viz. :—

[N.B. 1. Each of the places mentioned in these Stations, and numbered consecutively, from 1 to 875, is the head of the Circuit; and the Minister first named is the Superintendent. The Superintendent and other Minister or Ministers, stationed in or appointed to the several Circuits undermentioned, is and are appointed by the Conference to preach and to perform all acts of religious worship and Methodist discipline, in each and every one of the Wesleyan-Methodist Chapels already erected, or to be erected, in each Circuit respectively, within the space of twelve calendar months, at such time or times, and in such manner, as to him or them shall seem proper; subject, nevertheless, to the Superintendent Minister.

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EXAMINATIONS OF CANDIDATES FOR ORDINATION.

Q. XV. What are the Directions of the Conference respecting the THEOLOGICAL EXAMINATIONS OF CANDIDATES FOR ORDINATION ?

A. 1. Arrangements shall be made for conducting the Theological Examination of Candidates for Ordination at a time when the President of the Conference can attend, and when a large proportion of the Conference, including its official members, may be expected to be present.

2. An explicit declaration by each Candidate of his belief of the doctrines of Methodism shall be substituted for the present Theological Examination.

3. The attention of the Chairmen of Districts shall be called to the following regulations adopted by the Conference of 1815, viz. :—‘ Before any preacher, having travelled four years, is recommended by his District Meeting for admission into full Connexion, he shall undergo a careful examination by the Chairman of that Meeting, respecting his acquaintance with Mr. Wesley’s works in general, and especially with his Sermons and his Notes on the New Testament, in addition to the other examinations required by our existing rules ; and no preacher shall be so recommended unless the result of his examination be satisfactory to the Meeting.’ (Minutes of Conference, vol. iv., p. 122.)

N.B.—In order to prevent any doubts on the subject, the Conference directs that the above-named examination in Mr. Wesley’s works in general shall be in addition to such an examination in Theology as has been customary.

EXAMINATION OF PREACHERS ON TRIAL.

Q. XVI. What is the Report upon the EXAMINATION OF PREACHERS ON TRIAL for the ensuing year? And what are the directions of the Conference respecting the Examination of PREACHERS ON TRIAL for the ensuing year?

A. 1. The following is an abstract of the Report upon the Examination of Preachers on Trial.

The Examination was held on April 8th and 9th. The Supplementary Examinations prescribed by the Conference (*Minutes*, 1884, pp. 181, 182, §§. 9, 10, 15) were also held, in May, June, and July.

Of the entire number of probationers only two have not been examined. Of these one met with a serious accident; the other has resigned. Five probationers were absent from the Examination in April in consequence of ill-health. All these were examined at a later date.

Those who obtained less than one-third of the full number of marks in papers on Scripture subjects were re-examined in accordance with the resolution of the Conference of 1882. There were four cases of such failure, and the results of both Examinations were duly reported to the Conference.

The general result of the examination of the probationers of each year was as follows:—

FIRST YEAR.—4 probationers were examined, who wrote 16 papers, the valuation marks of which were as follows:—ii, 1; iii+, 5; iii, 6; iv+, 2; iv, 2.

SECOND YEAR.—23 probationers were examined, who wrote 112 papers, the valuation marks of which were as follows:—i+, 4; i, 8; ii+, 35; ii, 27; iii+, 23; iii, 8; iv+, 3; iv, 4. Eleven obtained Honours.

THIRD YEAR.—36 probationers were examined, who wrote 172 papers, the valuation marks of which were as follows:—i+, 5; i, 14; ii+, 42; ii, 44; iii+, 37; iii, 19; iv+, 3; iv, 6. There were two failures. Fourteen were placed in the Honours List.

FOURTH YEAR.—36 probationers were examined, who wrote 179 papers, the valuation marks of which were as follows:—i+, 6; i, 17; ii+, 24; ii, 57; iii+, 28; iii, 31; iv+, 5; iv, 10. There was one failure. Fifteen obtained Honours.

The average marks obtained by the examinees as compared with those of 1884 were as follows:—

FIRST YEAR.—In 1884 there were only two examinees in

this year. The marks for 1885 are :— Papers valued 3+, 31%; above 3+, 6%; below 3+, 62%.

SECOND YEAR, 1884.—3+, 23%; above 3+, 48%; below 3+, 28%. 1885.—3+, 20%; above 3+, 66%; below 3+, 13%.

THIRD YEAR, 1884.—3+, 21%; above 3+, 55%; below 3+, 22%. 1885.—3+, 21%; above 3+, 61%; below 3+, 17%.

FOURTH YEAR, 1884.—3+, 22%; above 3+, 34%; below 3+, 42%. 1885.—3+, 16%; above 3+, 58%; below 3+, 26%.

It will be observed that there were forty in the Honours list of 1885 as compared with twenty-four in that of 1884. The averages in the respective years are higher this year than in the preceding year.

2. (1) The Examination of Preachers on trial shall be conducted by a Connexional Board of Examiners, to consist of one Examiner in each subject contained in the course of reading prescribed for the four years of probation.

(2) In addition to the Probationers' Examination Committee, two General Examination Secretaries shall be appointed.

(3) Arrangements shall be made at each Financial District Meeting for a Central Examination of Preachers on trial in each District, or more than one if necessary; at which Central Examination or Examinations the Probationers in that District shall attend. In the event of any Preacher on trial being unable to pay the necessary travelling expenses, those expenses shall be defrayed, together with other expenses of the Examination, from the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund and from the Theological Institution Fund, in such proportions as the Committees of those Funds may decide.

(4) At each Financial District Meeting a District Probationers' Examination Secretary shall be appointed, or more than one, so as to provide a Secretary to take charge of each Central Examination in the District; and each District Secretary shall be held responsible for the efficient conduct of the Central Examination. Full and clear instructions as to the course to be pursued are to be forwarded to the District Secretaries by the General Secretaries.

(5) The Examination shall take place throughout the Connexion on the same days in the first week of April.

(6) The Examination-Papers, prepared under the direction of the Committee, shall be sent by the General Secretaries to each District Examination Secretary, whose duty it shall be to distribute them at the Central Examination, and by the earliest post transmit to the General Secretaries the Papers written by the several Probationers at those Examinations.

(7) The Probationers' Papers shall be forwarded by the General Secretaries to the Examiners for valuation, and each Examiner shall send to them the results of his valuation of the Papers shown by numbers, together with any remarks upon them which he may think desirable. In the case of the North and South Wales Districts, such variations from the foregoing arrangements are permitted as the Examination Secretaries may find necessary.

(8) The General Secretaries shall compile from the returns of the Examiners a complete Report upon the examination of each Probationer, and forward it to the District Examination Secretary, to be presented by him to the May District Meeting, together with such remarks on the Examination of the Preachers on trial in the District as he may think desirable. The numbers obtained by each Preacher on trial in the several subjects of Examination shall be entered on the District Minutes. The Resolutions of the District Meetings on the Examination of Preachers on trial shall be forwarded to the General Secretaries by the District Examination Secretaries.

(9) The Conference directs the General Examination Secretaries to send to each District Committee—in May—having one or more Candidates for Ordination, a Report showing the result of the examination of every such Candidate during each year of his probation.

(10) The General Secretaries shall prepare and present to the Conference a General Report upon the Examination of the Preachers on trial.

3. The following Ministers are appointed the Probationers'

Examination Committee for the ensuing year; viz.,—the PRESIDENT of the Conference, the Ex-President, the Tutors of the four Branches of the Theological Institution, the two General Examination Secretaries, the REV. DR. OSBORN, DR. GREGORY, DR. RIGG, DR. GEDEN, BENJAMIN HELLIER, GEORGE W. OLVER, B.A., and GEORGE O. BATE. The REV. DR. MOULTON is reappointed the Secretary of this Committee.

4. The REV. WILLIAM F. MOULTON, D.D., and GEORGE A. BENNETTS, B.A., are appointed the two General Examination Secretaries. The Conference directs the Rev. MacDonald Munro, B.A., to assist the General Examination Secretaries during the year.

7. The Conference requires every Probationer who is acquainted with Greek and Hebrew to take the Greek and Hebrew subjects which are specified in the list of subjects for his year. Every Probationer who has been a student in the Theological Institution shall be examined in these Greek and Hebrew subjects, unless the Tutors under whom he studied, having taken into consideration his attainments on leaving the Institution, are of opinion that these examinations cannot reasonably be required in his case.

8. The Conference requires every Probationer of the second, third and fourth years respectively to be examined in four subjects; but it expects such Probationers to be examined, as a rule, in five subjects. Probationers of the first year shall be examined

in four subjects. In all cases in which the full number of subjects is not taken, special attention shall be called to the fact in the report presented to the District Meeting.

9. Every Probationer of the second, third and fourth years respectively shall be examined in the subjects marked iv., v., and vi., in the list of subjects for his year. Every Probationer of the first year shall be examined in the subjects marked iii., iv., and v., in the list of subjects for his year.

10. Whenever a Probationer obtains less than one-third of the full number of marks for a paper on any portion of Scripture, either in the original language or in English, he shall be re-examined in the same subject, and the results of both examinations shall be specially reported to the Conference. In the examinations on the Hebrew Bible and Greek Testament, questions on points of grammar shall form an essential part of every paper set.

11. In the case of Probationers of the fourth year, the second examination referred to in the last paragraph shall, if possible, take place early in May, in order that the District Meeting may be made acquainted with the result. In other cases the second examination shall, as a rule, be held in the latter part of June.

12. Every Probationer shall, not later than the end of October, 1885, inform Dr. Moulton what subjects he will present for Examination.

13. Every Probationer whom the President of the Conference shall send into the work before Christmas-day, 1885, shall be examined in the subjects of his year.

14. If any student be removed from the Theological Institution for Circuit work later than Christmas-day in any year, he shall not be expected to take the subjects prescribed for the examination of Probationers; but provision shall be made for his being examined, not later than June, in five subjects arranged by his Tutors and the General Examination Secretaries, in accordance with the course of study which he pursued before leaving the Institution. In every instance three of the subjects presented for examination shall be Books (or portions

of Books) of Scripture. The result of this Examination shall be reported to the Conference, and shall be included in the special report required in the case of all candidates for ordination.

15. The days of Examination for the ensuing year shall be Wednesday and Thursday, March 31st and April 1st, 1886.

16. Should any Probationer be prevented by illness, or otherwise, from attending the Annual Examination, the General Secretaries shall, in concert with the Chairman of the District in which he is stationed, make suitable provision for his examination.

17. The Conference sees no sufficient reason for the exemption of those brethren who have formerly been Ministers in other Churches from the usual course of reading and examination prescribed by the Conference for Preachers on Trial, and directs that they be required to observe such regulations.

EXAMINATION OF CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY.

Q. XVII. What are the Directions of the Conference respecting the **EXAMINATION OF CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY?**

A. 1. (1) No Candidate for the Ministry shall be received who does not possess a fair acquaintance with English Grammar, Orthography, Arithmetic, Geography, and History.

(2) A preliminary Examination by papers which shall be prepared each year by the Tutors of the several Branches of the Theological Institution in turn, shall be conducted during the session of the District Meeting by a Sub-Committee of two or three Ministers, who shall value and report the answers of the Candidates. This Sub-Committee shall be elected by the District Committee. The answers shall be written in the presence of one or more Ministers, who need not be members of the Sub-Committee.

(3) In order to secure, as far as practicable, uniformity of valuation, figures showing the number of marks obtainable by a complete answer shall be placed at the end of each question, and no Candidate shall be considered to have passed a satisfactory examination who does not gain one-fourth of the maximum number of marks allotted to the whole of the papers. No Candidate shall be excused from the preliminary examination on the ground that he has passed it in a former year.

(4) No Candidate who has failed to obtain the minimum number of marks in the preliminary Examination shall undergo the usual Examination by the District Committee unless in the judgment of the Committee he possesses such special gifts as to justify an exceptional procedure.

2. The Special Examination of Candidates for the Ministry, who have passed the District Committees, shall be conducted by a Committee in two Sections, having charge of Examinations to be held simultaneously at Richmond and Didsbury, respectively.

(i.) The two Sections of this Committee shall be constituted as follows:—

(1) **THE SOUTHERN SECTION**, to meet at Richmond, shall consist of the President, Ex-President, and the Secretary of the Conference; the Ex-Presidents resident in London; the Secretaries of the Wesleyan-Methodist Missionary Society (one excepted); the Tutors and Governors of the Richmond and Birmingham Branches of the Theological Institution; the General Treasurer of the Theological Institution Fund; the Local Secretary of the Richmond Branch; the Financial Secretary of the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund; one of the General Secretaries of the Examination Committee; Dr. Moulton, the Rev. Peter Thompson, together with twelve other Ministers of the three London Districts, four of whom shall be annually elected by the District Committee of each of the said Districts in May.

(2) **THE NORTHERN SECTION**, to meet at Didsbury, shall consist of the Ex-Presidents living in the Manchester and adjoining Districts; one of the Secretaries of the Missionary Society; the Tutors and Governors of the Didsbury and Headingley Branches of the Theological Institution; the Local Secretary of the Didsbury Branch; one of the General Secretaries of the Examination Committee; the Rev. R. Wallis Boyns; together with twenty-one Ministers of the Liverpool, Manchester, and Bolton Districts, seven of whom shall be annually elected by the District Committee of each of the said Districts in May.

(ii.) Two Sub-Committees, to read and report on the manuscript sermons of the Candidates, shall be annually appointed as follows:—one for the Southern Section, consisting of six Ministers, two of whom shall be chosen by the District Committee of each of the three London Districts from among the Ministers elected by it as members of the Examination Committee; and another for the Northern Section, consisting of six Ministers, two of whom shall be chosen by the District Committees of the Liverpool, Manchester, and Bolton Districts respectively, from among the Ministers elected by them as members of the Examination Committee.

(iii.) The Literary Paper for the Examination shall be pre-

pared in succession by the Tutors in Biblical Literature and Classics of each of the four Branches of the Theological Institution; and the Theological Paper for the Examination shall be prepared in succession by the Theological Tutors of the said four Branches.

(iv.) The Tutors in Biblical Literature and Classics of the Richmond and Birmingham Branches shall be the Literary Examiners for the Southern Section of the Committee; and the Tutors in Biblical Literature and Classics of the Didsbury and Headingley Branches shall be the Literary Examiners for the Northern Section of the Committee.

(v.) The Examiners of the Papers in Theology, written by the Candidates, shall be appointed as follows:—each of the First and Second London, the Liverpool, and the Manchester Districts shall appoint one Examiner from among the Ministers elected by it as Members of the Examination Committee; thus providing two Examiners for each of its two Sections.

(vi.) The General Secretary of the Theological Institution, and the Rev. Charles H. Kelly are re-appointed General Secretaries of the Examination Committee. All communications relating to Candidates, and the Reports on their sermons heard after the District Committees, must be addressed to the Rev. Charles H. Kelly, *Spanish Close, Wandsworth Common, S.W.* The Ministers appointed to report on these sermons are requested not to fix marks of value.

(vii.) The Local Secretary of the Richmond Branch of the Theological Institution, and the Rev. Peter Thompson, are appointed to act as Examination Secretaries for the Southern Section; and the Local Secretary for the Didsbury Branch, and the Rev. R. Wallis Boyns, to act as Examination Secretaries for the Northern Section.

3. When Candidates for the Ministry are recommended by the North or South Wales District Committee, the General Secretaries of the Examination Committee shall summon a Welsh Minister to attend the Northern or Southern Section of the Committee, who shall be a member of that Committee.

Tweddle, Anthony Ward, and Richard Green, Convener, with instructions to confer with the Committee appointed by the Irish Conference, and to report to the next Conference.

RESOLUTIONS ON PASTORAL WORK.—1. The Conference adopted the codification presented by the Committee.

2. The Conference directed that the Codified Resolutions thus adopted should be printed in the Minutes (see Appendix, No. XI.), and that a copy, in pamphlet form, should be presented, under the direction of the Chairman, to every Preacher on trial in his District, on his appointment to his first Circuit

3. The Conference further directed that these Resolutions should be bound up with the large Minutes, as an Appendix, and that every candidate for the Ministry be required to read the Appendix.

4. The Conference also directed that the Resolutions as now codified, so far as the words "counted for a point," p. 20, be read in the stead of the Liverpool Minutes at the Meeting of each Annual District Committee, and at the Ministers' Meeting of each Circuit in September.

5. The hearty thanks of the Conference were presented to the Rev. Joseph Bush, for the valuable service rendered by him in compiling the Code of Resolutions.

OFFICE OF CHAIRMAN OF A DISTRICT.—The Committee

To the above Committee the Conference referred the suggestion 'that in the choice of Chairmen of Districts a clear majority of the votes cast shall be required for an election.'

SUPPLY OF CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY.—The following were appointed a Committee to consider during the year the question of the supply of Candidates for the Ministry, with relation both to their number and fitness, together with the constitution of the President's List of Reserve. The further question of the residence and maintenance of those on the President's List of Reserve who have completed their term at the Institution was referred to the same Committee, namely:—The Ex-President, the Governors and Tutors of the four Branches of the Institution; the Secretaries of the Missionary Society; the Secretaries of the Home-Mission Fund; with the Rev. J. Ernest Clapham, Walford Green, Charles H. Kelly, David C. Ingram, Dr. Osborn, Dr. Rigg, William J. Tweddle, David J. Waller, and Charles H. Kelly, Convener.

CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY WHO ARE UNIVERSITY GRADUATES.—The Conference resolves that those candidates for the Ministry who have taken a degree in any one of the Universities of the United Kingdom, shall not of necessity spend the full term of three years in the Theological Institution, but, on the recommendation of the staff of the Branch, the term of their residence may be shortened.

POLITICAL MEETINGS IN WESLEYAN-METHODIST TRUST PREMISES.—Having regard to the fact that a desire has been expressed in some places to use our Trust property for the purpose of political meetings, the Conference declares that such uses are not contemplated by the provisions of any of our Trust Deeds; and it reminds Superintendents and Trustees that our Trust properties can only be lawfully used for the purposes provided for in the Trust Deeds. The Conference further expresses the conviction that any such use of the premises as that suggested would be detrimental to the best interests of our Societies by endangering their peace and unity.

RETIREMENT OF THE REV. DR. OSBORN.—In granting the request of the Rev. Dr. Osborn to be allowed to retire from the full work of the Ministry, the Conference desires to place on record its profound esteem for his personal character and its grateful appreciation of the varied and distinguished services which he has rendered, during fifty-seven years of public life, to Methodism and the general interests of religion. The Conference recalls with gratitude to Almighty God his able and lucid expositions of Divine truth, the wisdom of those counsels which have on many occasions guided it in its deliberations to safe conclusions, his fidelity to the doctrines and principles of Wesleyan-Methodism, his unrivalled knowledge of its history and economy, his loyal attachment to the several departments of its work, and his unwearied devotion to its interests both at home and abroad. The Conference assures him of the prayerful and loving sympathy which will attend him in his comparative

retirement; and it indulges the hope that he may be permitted for many years to come to render to the Connexion the benefit of his personal example, his long experience and his ripened wisdom.

RETIREMENT OF THE REV. JOHN H. LORD.—The Conference gratefully records its sense of the long and valuable services of the Rev. John H. Lord, and of the high character which he has maintained during a ministry of forty-five years. It recognises the faithfulness and ability with which he has served the Connexion as a Circuit Minister, and as Governor of New Kingswood School. The unfailing kindness and courtesy with which he has discharged the varied and difficult duties of the latter office have won for him the lasting affection of his brethren and their children. The Conference earnestly hopes that his life may be long spared, and that the blessing of God may attend him in his years of rest.

REVISION OF THE CATECHISM.—The Conference re-appoints the Committee, viz., the Rev. Dr. Osborn, Frederick W. Briggs, M.A., Dr. Gregory, Dr. Moulton, Dr. Pope, Marshall Randles, Dr. Rigg, Charles H. Kelly, with the addition of Joseph Agar Beet, and directs it to consider the advisability of restoring the Authorized Version of the proof texts of the Revised Catechism, except in very special cases. The Rev. Charles H. Kelly is the Convener of the Committee.

ELECTION OF MINISTERS TO ATTEND THE CONFERENCE IN ITS REPRESENTATIVE SESSION.—1. The Conference resolves:—

1. That the election of Ministers to attend the Conference in its Representative Session shall be made from among the whole number of Ministers in any District who may express their desire to attend the Conference, and not, as at present, from among those elected to attend the Conference in its Pastoral Session. (See Minutes, 1884, p. 361).

2. That Ministers so elected shall have permission to attend the Conference in its Pastoral Session.

3. That the Ministers necessary to complete the number allocated to the District to attend the Conference during its Pastoral Session shall be next elected.

4. That in the event of any Minister elected to attend the Conference in its Representative Session offering to provide for himself, his election shall not thereby be rendered void.

NUMBERING OF CIRCUITS AND STATIONS.—The Conference referred to the following Committee the consideration of a suggestion to the effect ‘that in order to avoid perplexity as to the Minister legally entitled to preside at Trustees’ Meetings, all Circuits and Stations shall be numbered’: The Ex-President and Secretary of the Conference, the Rev. Joseph Bush, George Penman, James E. Clapham, and David J. Waller, Convener.

Q. XXIII. What are the COMMITTEES FOR GUARDING OUR PRIVILEGES during the ensuing year ?

The ORDINARY COMMITTEE, which shall have full power to take action in all cases affecting our Connexional or public interests, unless in its judgment, or in the judgment of the President of the Conference, it is deemed expedient to refer any case to the Extraordinary Committee named below. 3. (i.) The Conference resolved that the Committee of Privileges be authorised to secure the introduction into Parliament, in its next Session, of a Bill relieving Nonconformists from the presence of the Registrar at Marriages celebrated in their places [of worship, such measure being based upon the principles laid down in the Minutes of Conference, 1883, p. 247.

(ii.) That the Committee be instructed to support any measure introduced into Parliament next Session, which shall enable Nonconformists to secure sites for places of worship where such sites cannot be obtained otherwise than by the exercise of compulsory powers, and further that the Committee be authorised to present petitions to Parliament in favour of any such measure, subject to such alterations and amendments in the Bill as the Committee may deem necessary.

(iii.) The Conference approves of the principle that all needful facilities should be given for the compulsory enfranchisement of chapels erected on leasehold sites, and directs the Committee of Privileges to give their attention to this subject in connection with any measure which may come before Parliament.

MISSIONS.

Q. XXIV. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of our FOREIGN MISSIONS ?

A. 1. The thanks of the Conference are presented to SIR WILLIAM M'ARTHUR, K.C.M.G., M.P., and the REV. JAMES H. RIGG, D.D., the General Treasurers of the Wesleyan-Methodist Missionary Society.

2. SIR WILLIAM M'ARTHUR, K.C.M.G., M.P., and the REV. DR. RIGG are re-appointed the General Treasurers. The REV. JOHN KILNER is re-appointed the Deputy Treasurer.

3. The following are appointed the General Committee of Management for the ensuing year; viz., REV. RICHARD ROBERTS, President of the Conference; REV. N.B.—The Treasurer of any District Auxiliary Society in Great Britain, and the Chairman of any District, who may be in London at the time of holding any Meeting of the General

Committee, shall be entitled to sit and vote with the Committee; and the Treasurer, or Treasurers, of the London Districts' Auxiliary Society shall be regularly summoned to the Committee. Messrs. ALFRED PARKER, F. PORTER SMITH, T. H. BARLOW, M.D., and HOWARD BARRETT are requested to act as a Medical Sub-Committee.

4. The Conference welcomes with devout gratitude to Almighty God the safe return of the Rev. Ebenezer E. Jenkins, M.A., from his recent visit to Ceylon, India, and China; and believes that the result of that visit will be the extension and consolidation of our Eastern Missions, especially in the direction of the increase and systematic training of the Native Ministry, the multiplication of Village Schools, the united action of the several Districts for mutual consultation on difficulties relating to the work and to the government common to them all, and the general advancement of the Society's Missions. The Conference records its hearty appreciation of the zeal and ability with which Mr. Jenkins has discharged his arduous Mission.

5. On the presentation of the Report of the Missionary Committee, on the question referred to it by the last Conference, as to the length of service which may be required of Missionaries on the various stations, and as to the furloughs of Missionaries, the Conference resolved:—

- (1) That the regulations of 1827 be rescinded.
- (2) That whilst the present rule shall be maintained that no missionary shall at any time return without the sanction of the Committee, yet every application shall be decided upon its own merits.
- (3) That in the same way every application for furlough shall be dealt with on its own merits; only providing that after ten years' continuous service each Missionary shall have a claim to a twelve-months' furlough.

For the Report of the Committee in detail, see Appendix, No. III.

6. THE MISSIONARY SECRETARIAT.—The following Report of

the Committee appointed by the Conference of 1884 to consider the question of the Missionary Secretariat was submitted to the Conference and adopted:—

(1) That in the judgment of this Committee it is not expedient to reduce the number of the General Secretaries of the Missionary Society.

(2) The Committee inquired at length into the several departments in which the business of the Society is transacted, and received from the Secretaries full and detailed information as to the mode in which that business is distributed among themselves without impairing their collective responsibility for its transaction; and, as the result, came to the conclusion that it would not be for the advantage of the Society to recommend the modification of existing arrangements.

(3) Having considered whether any advantage would arise from the residence of one of the Secretaries in the provinces, or from the appointment of provincial Secretaries, with a view to the relief of the General Secretaries, the Committee see nothing to be gained by such an arrangement or appointment, but many practical difficulties and objections.

(4) The Committee recommends that the arrangement for the distribution of work amongst the Secretaries be published in the Annual Reports and Monthly Notices; and that it be stated at the same time that the Secretaries are jointly responsible for the direction of the whole business of the Society.

(5) In the judgment of the Committee it is highly important, if not essential, in order to secure the efficiency of the Society's organization, that a more diligent and vigorous working of the District and Circuit agencies be effected; and that this will be most likely to be accomplished by the revival of missionary enthusiasm, and the more careful oversight of the District Auxiliaries and Circuit Branches in the May District Meetings. The Committee suggests that the Secretaries be requested to prepare a series of questions relating to the efficiency of the Auxiliary and Branch Societies, and asks the Conference to direct that these shall form part of the business of the District

Meetings, and be inserted in the Order and Form of Business in District Committees.

7. The Conference directs that the General Committee of the Wesleyan Missionary Society and the Committee of the Home-Mission Fund shall meet during the year, either separately or jointly, as may be convenient, to consider the question of affording facilities for the acceptance of Candidates from Ireland for Mission Work; and also the employment of Irish Ministers in Foreign Mission Work, and the terms on which their service might be accepted, and to report to the next Conference.

8. The Conference resolves that inasmuch as the instruction to the Committee in 1882 (Min. p., 237), namely, 'Under any circumstances the Conference instructs the Committee to bring its Expenditure within its Income' was not intended permanently to determine the policy of the Society; the Conference learns with satisfaction that the Expenditure of the Society has at last been brought within its Income, and is thankful that the way is now open for a judicious but more vigorous advance of our Missionary Work, and therefore appeals to the Connexion for a large and permanent increase in the Annual Income.

9. **JUVENILE MISSIONARY ASSOCIATIONS.**—The Conference directs that a return of the gross amount collected in the various Circuits by Juvenile Missionary Associations, with the proportions of that amount allocated to the various objects, shall be made yearly at the May Meeting of the District Committees.

10. **THE SOUTH CEYLON DISTRICT.**—This District having been divided into three Districts, namely, the Colombo District, the Kandy District, and the Galle District, in order to secure the free interchange of Ministers between the three Districts, and the administration of interests common to all three, and also the advantages of representative counsel for the three Districts, resolved, that a Committee, to be called the **COMMITTEE OF REVIEW**, shall be annually appointed.

(1) The first business of the Annual Committee of Review shall be the election of a Chairman and Secretary, who shall hold their offices for the year,

(2) This Committee shall be empowered to allot the European Missionaries, Native Ministers, and Catechists to each District from year to year, leaving each District Meeting to recommend to the General Committee the appointment to the several Circuits of the brethren so allotted to the District.

(3) The written examinations of Candidates and Probationers, and the training of Candidates, shall come under the review of this Committee.

(4) Written examinations shall be uniform for the three Districts, and be conducted by the Committee of Review, but Candidates are to be examined orally and their case decided on by the District Meeting of that District from which they come.

(5) The Students under training shall in future reside at Richmond Hill, Galle. Their studies shall be under the direction of the Principal of Richmond College, subject to the decisions of the Committee of Review.

(6) The Committee of Review shall consist of the Chairman and Secretary, and two other Ministers in full Connexion from each District.

(7) The Committee of Review shall meet a short time before the Annual District Meetings in each year, and at any other period, should the Chairman of either District so require.

(8) The time and place of the annual meeting of the Committee of Review shall be determined by the previous annual Meeting of such Committee; but the first annual Meeting shall be held at Colpetty, on Wednesday, January 13th, 1886.

N.B.—Each of the three District Meetings shall be convened by the Chairman as soon as convenient after the present Conference, for the purpose of electing a Secretary, and two other members of the Committee of Review, and also for the purpose of fixing the time and place for the next annual District Meeting, provided that such time be not earlier than January 18th, 1886.

THE SCHOOLS AND CHILDREN'S FUNDS.

Q. XXV. What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the affairs of our FUNDS FOR THE EDUCATION AND MAINTENANCE OF MINISTERS' CHILDREN?

EDUCATION: SCHOOLS FUND.

(2) *Head Mastership* :—

The Conference has received with the deepest regret the

Reports of the General Committee and of the Governing Body conveying Mr. Osborn's intention of resigning his post as Head Master of Kingswood School. It desires to record in the strongest terms its deep and grateful sense of the invaluable service rendered by Mr. Osborn to the School during nearly twenty years of incessant and unwearied labour in its interests; of the great ability with which he has directed it during successive periods of its history, especially during the difficulties incident to the concentration of the Schools upon one site, and of the deep and abiding influence for good which he has exercised upon successive generations of boys committed to his care. The results of Mr. Osborn's painstaking work have been evinced, not less in the admirable training and discipline of the whole School than in the numerous and brilliant successes at the Universities which for many years have been gained by the higher scholars, and which have given the School such a distinguished position in the country. The Conference entertains a profound sense of the loss which the School will sustain in the removal of Mr. Osborn, and of the debt under which the whole Connexion has been placed to him by his able, faithful, self-denying and long-continued services in the training of its Ministers' sons.

(3) *Appointment of Head Master* :—

The Conference approves of the appointment of Henry Jefferson, Esq., M.A., to the Head Mastership of Kingswood School as successor to Mr. T. G. Osborn, M.A.

(4) The Conference directs that the General Committee shall consider and re-arrange the provisions of the Scheme of Management, so that they may harmonise with the Trust Deed.

11. QUEENSWOOD SCHOOL.

The Conference hereby confirms the action of the Governing Body of the School for Girls, and of the General Committee in authorising the Local Treasurer of Queenswood School, the Rev. John Wakefield Greeves, to purchase (1) the remainder of Mr. George Long's Lease of the property at No. 4, King's Road, Clapham, for the sum of £2,850; and (2) Cubitt's

interest in the same premises for a sum not exceeding £400.

By these purchases, and by certain necessary alterations,—the estimated cost of which will amount to £800,—the Thanksgiving Fund Grant of £5,000 for the establishment of a Southern School for Ministers' daughters will be reduced to £950. (£2,850 + £400 + £800 = £4,050. £5,000 less £4,050 = £950.)

The Conference directs that the suggestion of the General Committee for replacing the said Grant of £5,000 be carried out, and that the Board of Trustees for Chapel purposes be hereby authorised to arrange for the investment of the money at compound interest, upon terms to be agreed upon by the Board and the General Committee.

12. ADMISSION TO THE SCHOOLS.—(1) *On the Foundation.* The number of boys for whom provision is made is 250. Boys so admitted may remain five years on the foundation.

(2) *On Payment.* In addition to these, fifty boys are received annually on payment. In the case of boys who have received neither education allowance nor schooling the charge is £25. Parents whose boys are thus received will be entitled, for that year, to the usual allowances from the Children's Fund and twelve pounds for Education.

The Rule as to extra years shall be construed in harmony with Clause thirty-two of the Scheme of Management. In every case where an extra year, at the end, is granted to any boy or girl, the sum of £30 shall be paid. Parents whose children are granted an extra year are entitled to the six guineas from the Children's Fund, and, unless they have already received for six years, the twelve pounds for Education. All payments for children at the Schools, whether £25 for first year or £30 for extra year, are due in four equal instalments, one on each quarter day; and the money must be sent to the REV. JOHN HARVARD, 197, *Great Cheetham Street, Manchester.*

(3) *Application for Admission.* Not later than the 1st of March, the name and age of every applicant for admission

must be sent, in the case of boys, to the REV. JOHN S. SIMON, *Springfield Villa, Cotham Brow, Bristol*; and, in the case of girls, to the REV. D. C. INGRAM, 9, *Oakland Road, Redland, Bristol*: the boys must not be less than ten, and girls not less than twelve, years of age at the next Midsummer.

(4) *Examinations for Entrance.* Standard IV. Candidates ten years of age. Reading—A few lines of poetry to be read intelligently. Writing from Dictation—A short passage from an easy Reading-Book. Arithmetic—The First Four Rules, Simple and Compound (Money only). Grammar—The Parts of Speech. To parse a simple sentence. Geography—Outlines of Geography of England and Wales. History—Elementary knowledge of the main facts of English History. Scripture—Main facts of Scripture History, as contained in Appendix to Catechism, Part I.

Standard V. Candidates eleven years of age. Reading—Intelligent reading of a more difficult passage. Dictation—Short passage from an easy author. Arithmetic—The First Four Rules, Simple and Compound (Money and Weights and Measures) and Practice. Grammar—Elementary work. Parsing simple sentences. Geography—Outlines of Geography of Great Britain and the Colonies. History—Outlines of History of England. Scripture—Main facts of Scripture History.

Standard VI. Candidates twelve years of age. Reading and Dictation—As above for Standard V., but more advanced. Arithmetic—As Standard V., with Elementary Vulgar Fractions. Grammar—Analysis and Parsing of simple sentences. Geography—Outlines of Geography of Europe (including British Isles). History—Outlines of History of England. Scripture—Main facts of Scripture History.

13. NUMBER OF YEARS AT KINGSWOOD SCHOOL.—[Rule 3, Min. Conf., 1881, p. 224. 'The Conference directs that the number of years which a boy may spend at School without payment be reduced from six to five.'] The Conference directs that the application and enforcement of this rule for the

year 1885-6, be left to the discretion of the General Committee.

14. NOTICE OF REMOVAL FROM SCHOOL.—The Conference directs that, in order to avoid any unnecessary disturbance of arrangements made for the teaching and general management of the Schools, and in order to give the Governing Bodies sufficient time to make an equitable selection of candidates for any vacancies which may occur during the year, parents having children at the Schools be required to give three months' notice before the removal of such child or children.

15. WOODHOUSE-GROVE SCHOOL, LIMITED.—The Conference directs that the fee for Ministers' sons at Woodhouse-Grove School be £21 for the year 1885-6.

16. EDUCATIONAL ALLOWANCES FOR CHILDREN NOT AT THE SCHOOLS.—Payments are made at the Conference for the past year; and in every case in which the Educational Allowance has been received by the parent, the claim upon the Schools Fund shall be understood to have been met and satisfied for that year. Claimants must be nine years of age on or before the previous Christmas-day.

17. CIRCUIT SCHEDULES.—Not later than the 1st of March, each Superintendent shall send to the REV. MARSHALL HARTLEY, 16, *Gascoyne Road, South Hackney, London, E.*, a particular account of all claims for Educational Allowances in his Circuit, specifying distinctly the names of the children for whose education the claims are made, together with the date, year, and place of their birth, and the exact number of years during which the allowance has been received.

18. The thanks of the Conference are presented to the Officers of the Schools Fund, the General Committee, the Governing Bodies, with their Treasurers and Secretaries, and to the Executive Committees, for the diligent and faithful discharge of the duties of their respective offices during the year; also to Mr. Hartley Blackburn, of Bradford, for his valuable services as Auditor of Kingswood-School Accounts.

BLAIRGOWRIE BEQUEST.—The Conference receives with satisfaction the communication from the Trustees of the late Mr. and Mrs. Borrie, respecting a bequest for the establishment and support of Methodism in Blairgowrie and its neighbourhood, and for the Home and Foreign Missionary Funds. In accepting the benefits of these generous settlements, the Conference expresses its sense of obligation to the Trustees for the considerate and courteous manner in which they have endeavoured to carry out the wishes of the testator, in harmony with our rules and usages.

SOUTH WALES DISTRICT CHAPEL FUND.**ADMINISTRATION OF THE FUND.**

On the recommendation of the Committee of the South Wales Chapel Fund, and of the South Wales District Meeting, the Conference approves and adopts the following amended scheme for the administration of the Fund.

1. **GRANTS.**—That a distinct and separate Fund be raised for Grants only, to arise from the following sources:—

(1) The interest of £1,000 Grant from the Thanksgiving Fund to be invested until further determined, for the benefit of this branch of the South Wales Chapel Fund.

(2) The Annual Collections and Subscriptions to the Fund.

(3) The Annual Contributions as hitherto received from the Sunday-School Fund.

(4) The General Chapel Committee are authorised, if they deem it desirable, to make an Annual Grant of £50, for a period not exceeding four years, from the General Chapel Fund, to meet a similar sum to be contributed in the District in addition to the Annual Income previously raised, to be paid on such conditions as the General Chapel Committee may determine.

(5) No Grant shall be promised from this Fund to any new erection until the Fund has been in full operation for four years, unless the entire income of the Fund exceed £250 per annum.

2. **LOANS.**—That the two branches of the Loan Fund be united in one, to be used either for aiding new Chapel Erections, or for the payment of old Chapel Debts, or for Ministers' Houses, as the Committee may from time to time determine. The General Chapel Committee are authorised, if they deem it desirable, to advance a new Loan, not exceeding £500, to the South Wales Chapel Committee, to be repaid in equal half-yearly instalments.

3. That special permission is given to the Committee of the South Wales Chapel Fund to aid in the removal of the whole

of the Chapel debts in the District, as reported to the May District Meeting, 1884.

4. Subject to the foregoing amendment, the Regulations adopted by the Conference in 1878, shall remain in force.

applied in the following shares or proportions :—The sum of £100 of the said Interest shall be carried yearly to the capital of the Loan Fund, and the entire remainder of the Interest shall be applied yearly in free Grants, either for Relief or Extension.

3. HOME-MISSION AND CONTINGENT FUND.

Q. XXVII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference in reference to the HOME-MISSION AND CONTINGENT FUND and other HOME-MISSION AFFAIRS?

A. 1. The Conference receives and adopts the Report of the Committee, and of the Army and Navy Sub-Committee; and directs that the Returns from the Army and Navy and Reserve Forces be printed in the Minutes. (See Appendix, No. II.)

METHODISM IN VILLAGES.

2. (1) The Conference directs the several District Committees, at their meetings in September, to arrange, either by the Home-Mission Sub-Committee, or in some other way, to collect information as to the present condition of Wesleyan-Methodism in the villages, and to offer suggestions as to the means to be employed for improving it. They are desired to state what is the religious provision supplied in the villages by other Methodist Churches. Such information and suggestions are to be considered by each District Committee in May, and forwarded, with any suggestion the District Committee desire to make, for consideration by the Committee of the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund.

(2) The Home-Mission Committee is empowered to appoint a Special Sub-Committee, including, if they shall think it expedient, members of the Representative Session of the Conference who are not appointed on the Home-Mission Committee, to consider the Reports sent by the District Committees, and to prepare Resolutions to be submitted to the Special Meeting of the Home-Mission Committee held in July.

DUTIES DEVOLVED ON DISTRICT HOME-MISSION SUB-COMMITTEES.

3. The Grants for the employment of Lay Agents shall be expended under the direction of the District Home-Mission Sub-Committee, and in every case a Report of the labours of Agents so employed shall be made to the District Committees

in May; together with an account of the amounts raised in the several Districts for the support of these Lay Agents.

4. The Conference directs, in addition to the regulations now in force, that the reports of all Home-Mission work, including Army and Navy work, done within the limits of any District, shall be submitted to the Home-Mission District Sub-Committee, who shall present them, with any needful remarks thereupon, to the District Committee at its Annual Meeting.

LAY MISSIONS.

The Conference receives the Reports of the Metropolitan, the Manchester and Salford, and the Liverpool Lay Missions, and it again commends these Missions to the generous support of the Connexion.

METHODISM IN THE CITY OF LONDON.

The Conference adopts the Report and re-appoints the Committee to consider the best means of making suitable provision for Methodism in the City, with power to promote the purchase of a site for a chapel or other premises, if such purchase be thought expedient, namely:—Rev. Richard Roberts, President of the Conference; Rev. Dr. Young, Secretary of the Conference; Rev. Dr. Greeves, Ex-President; the Rev. John Bond, Joseph Bush, John W. Greeves, William Hirst, William Hudson, Ebenezer E. Jenkins, M.A., Charles H. Kelly, George Kenyon, Alexander M'Aulay, John M'Kenny, James F. Pyle, Dr. Rigg, David J. Waller, Anthony Ward, Theophilus Woolmer; with Messrs. W. J. Almond, John Beauchamp, James Hargreaves, T. Morgan Harvey, George Hayman, Sir William M'Arthur, Robert W. Perks, William W. Pocock, Clarence Smith, Lancelot Smith, Ralph Smith, William Taylor, John Vanner, John Webster, William L. Williams, and James Yeo. The Rev. William Hudson, Convener.

LONDON WESLEYAN-METHODIST MISSION.

The Conference approves the following Scheme :—

I. The Movement shall be called ‘The London Wesleyan-Methodist Mission.’

II. Object of the Mission :—

To carry the Gospel to such regions of London, and especially of Central London, as are most spiritually destitute and degraded.

III. Finances :—

(A) 1. It is proposed to raise the sum of £50,000, which shall be applied, both as to principal and interest, wholly to the work in the most spiritually destitute parts of London. Subscriptions to this principal sum shall be payable either at once, or in instalments, extending over a period not exceeding five years.

2. In order to secure its appropriation to this object only, the Fund shall be vested in six Trustees (three Ministers and three Laymen). The Committee of the London Mission (see E. 1) shall report to the Conference any vacancies in the Trust that may have occurred during the year, and when the number of Trustees shall have been reduced to four, the Committee shall nominate and the Conference appoint Ministers or Laymen, as may be required, to fill the vacancies.

3. As it is impossible to define the boundaries of ‘the most spiritually destitute parts of London,’ the Committee shall decide, as the cases arise, whether they are included within the scope of the movement; provided that in all cases where the Trustees, or a majority of them, are of opinion that any proposed District is not so included, the Committee shall appoint a Sub-Committee, consisting of the Trustees and an equal number of the Committee, who shall finally decide.

(B) 1. An annual income shall be raised by Subscriptions, Donations and Legacies; by Grants from the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund, and from the Home-Mission surpluses of the three London Districts; and, where possible, by Public Collections. These shall be appropriated either specifically (at request of the donors), or generally for the purposes of the

Mission. Out of this income Grants may be made, payable quarterly, for the support of Mission work not included in 'the most spiritually destitute parts of London,' but within the City and Metropolitan Police Area.

2. The financial year shall close on March 31st, and the accounts shall then be audited.

IV. Scope of the Mission :—

(A) Missions not worked by Circuits.

1. In order to facilitate the work of the Mission, and prevent friction, certain districts, the spiritual needs of which cannot be provided for by the Circuits to which they belong, shall be detached from such Circuits, and constituted special ground for Home-Mission work, the boundaries of such Mission districts being carefully defined. In cases where all parties are agreed, the Committee shall have power to complete the necessary negotiations. In cases where all parties are not agreed, the course of procedure shall be in accordance with our established Rules.

2. Prosperous Suburban Circuits shall be invited to take under their care any such detached district or portion of a district as may be agreed upon with the Committee.

3. The Committee shall have power, with the consent of all parties interested, and on terms to be agreed upon, to take over Chapels or Mission Halls not efficiently worked by existing agencies. The boundaries of the districts assigned to such Chapels or Mission Halls shall be carefully defined, and due regard had to any legal questions that might arise. In all cases, the Committee shall decide, subject to the proviso contained in (A) 3, whether such transfers come within the sphere of their special work.

4. The Committee shall have power to rent, purchase or build Mission-premises in the detached Mission districts, care being taken to secure properly drawn agreements, and in the case of purchase or building, the due settlement of the estate. In building Mission-premises, the Committee hope to receive assistance from the Metropolitan Chapel Building Fund, under its amended rules.

5. Wherever the Committee may think it desirable, they shall have power to provide, in connection with any Chapels or Mission Halls, additional premises to be used for the social and philanthropic work of the Mission.

6. The Committee shall have power to maintain, in whole or in part, suitable Ministerial and Lay agents for Mission work in these districts.

7. The Committee shall have power to negotiate for the restoration to Circuits, or incorporation with adjacent Circuits, of any detached Mission districts in which Societies have been formed, and which can be efficiently worked by such Circuits.

(B) Missions in 'the most spiritually destitute parts of London,' worked by the Circuits in which they are situate.

1. The Committee may assist by means of annual grants, or otherwise, any Missions (in such parts of London) which with such help may be efficiently worked by the Circuits to which they belong. In each case a Quarterly Report shall be presented to the Committee.

2. The Committee may also assist in the hire or erection of Mission-premises in such Circuits.

3. It is not proposed, at present at least, to lay down any specific regulations under which such assistance shall be granted, as, in almost all the cases contemplated, the degree of poverty in the neighbourhood will be the main fact to be considered.

(c) Existing Chapels.

Inasmuch as several existing Chapels, situate in the midst of 'the most spiritually destitute parts of London,' have small and diminishing congregations, and fail under the ordinary methods to attract the multitudes living around them, the Committee may assist the Trustees of any such Chapels as shall be thrown open for Mission Services, by undertaking some portion of the expense incident to such Services.

(D) Missions outside 'the most spiritually destitute parts of London.'

1. The Committee shall have power, from such portions of the annual income of the Fund as are not otherwise specifically

appropriated, to make Grants towards the support of Lay Agents employed in Mission work within the City and Metropolitan Police Area.

2. The Committee may also aid in the extension of Mission work by voluntary agencies under Circuit control.

(E) Government.

1. The Committee of the London Wesleyan-Methodist Mission shall consist of the President and the Secretary of the Conference, the Trustees of the Fund, the Officers of the Fund, viz., one Ministerial and one Lay Treasurer, and three Ministerial and two Lay Secretaries, the Officers of the Home-Mission and Metropolitan Chapel Building Funds, all ordained Ministers appointed to the work of the Mission, the Members of the Home-Mission Sub-Committees of the three London Districts, and six Ministers and six Laymen to be appointed by the Conference; with power to add to their number Ministers and Laymen in equal proportions not exceeding six.

2. The Committee, at its first Meeting after the Conference, shall appoint a Sub-Committee for each principal Mission under its control, which shall be the Executive Committee of such Mission.

3. No person who is a Class-leader in any Circuit shall be appointed a Class-leader in a Mission district, without the consent of the Superintendent of the Circuit to which he belongs.

4. Great care shall be taken to avoid withdrawing persons already engaged in Christian work from the Circuits to which they belong. All workers in Mission districts, who are Members of the Society in any Circuit, shall be strongly advised to retain their membership in such Circuits.

5. The number of Members in Society in any Mission district shall be reported separately to the District Meeting and to the Conference.

The Conference appoints the following to be the Trustees of the Special Fund ((A) 2). Rev. Alexander M'Aulay, Dr. Rigg, Walford Green, Sir William M'Arthur, Messrs. T. Morgan Harvey and John Beauchamp.

The Rev. Walford Green and Mr. T. Morgan Harvey are appointed the Treasurers of the Fund; the Rev. J. Ernest Clapham, Organising Secretary; and the Rev. J. Hugh Morgan and J. Surman Cooke, Sir George Hayter Chubb and Mr. John Coates, Secretaries.

The following six Ministers, and six Laymen, are appointed members of the Committee, viz., Rev. Richard W. Allen, Robert P. Downes, Hugh Price Hughes, M.A., W. Darlow Sarjeant, Dr. Stephenson and David J. Waller; Messrs. Henry Avis, James C. Coates, John G. Harding, George Lidgett, William W. Pocock and James Vanner.

The Conference appoints the following Sub-committee to consider whether a special form of deed is advisable for Mission premises hereafter to be acquired, viz., Rev. William J. Brown, Joseph Bush, Henry J. Pope and Dr. Rigg; Messrs. Henry Avis, John Beauchamp, George Lidgett and William W. Pocock, together with the officers of the Fund.

The Committee is directed to revise the Rules of the Metropolitan Lay Mission, the work of which is now to be incorporated in the London Wesleyan-Methodist Mission, so as to make them applicable to the Mission.

WORN-OUT MINISTERS' AND MINISTERS' WIDOWS' AUXILIARY FUND.

Q. XXVIII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the affairs of the AUXILIARY FUND?

A. 1. The Conference receives and adopts the Report of the Committee.

2. The Conference acknowledges with gratitude to God, and with sincere thanks to the friends of this Fund, the very liberal support accorded to it during the past year; but, having respect to the many heavy claims upon it, urges the necessity of continued and even increased effort on its behalf. The Conference is especially anxious that the three chief sources of

income—the contributions in the Classes, the Private Subscriptions, and the Public Collections—should be efficiently maintained.

3. The Conference directs that, in addition to the report of the Contributions in the Classes, a report shall be made to the District Committee at its Annual Meeting of the amount of the Private Subscriptions and the Public Collections in each Circuit for the year immediately preceding.

4. The Conference is gratified to find that the amount received for Legacies during the past year was £4,867 9s. 6d. It is a source of satisfaction to the Conference, that so many who have taken an interest in this Fund remember it in the final disposal of their property.

5. The Conference is pleased to learn that during the year ending March 9th, 1885, the sum of £1,065 10s. was paid on account of the Special Fund originated by the late Rev. John Rattenbury, making the total amount paid up to that date £59,306 4s. 3d., all of which has been invested, together with other amounts, by the Trustees of the Investment Fund. While it is impossible to close this Special Fund for some years, since some subscriptions promised as late as 1877 were to be paid in instalments in ten years, and a few large amounts included in the promises were to be left by the donors in their wills, the Conference trusts that the Subscribers, whose contributions are now due, will favour the Treasurers with as early remittances as possible.

6. The Conference resolves that the scale of allowances to Ministers' Widows shall be the same as last year—viz., fourteen pounds in addition to ten shillings per annum for each year that the husband travelled.

7. The thanks of the Conference are presented to the Rev. Dr. Williams and Mr. John Napier, the General Treasurers, and to the Rev. Herbert Hoare, the Secretary; also to the District Treasurers and the Circuit Treasurers, for their services during the past year.

8. The thanks of the Conference are presented to those friends

who, during the past year, have generously aided this Fund by special Donations; to those Executors who have paid Legacies to this Fund; and also to those Trustees who have contributed to it from their Chapel-income.

9. The REV. DR. WILLIAMS and MR. JOHN NAPIER are re-appointed the General Treasurers, and the REV. HERBERT HOARE is re-appointed the Secretary.

10. The following persons are appointed the Committee of Management for the ensuing year; who shall superintend the general working of the Fund, and also consider and decide upon such peculiar cases of affliction or distress among the Supernumerary Ministers, and Ministers' widows, as may be recommended by the District Committees for special and occasional relief, viz. :—

11. The Conference directs that the following resolutions previously adopted shall be reprinted:—

(1) The Conference resolves that wherever it is practicable two Collections shall be made annually in each Chapel throughout the Connexion on behalf of the Funds of the Theological Institution, and that these Collections shall be made, if possible, on some Sunday in December, and directs the Superintendents of Circuits to remit all subscriptions and collections for the Theological Institution to the General Treasurers early in the year, and the Chairmen of Districts to ascertain, by inquiry at the May District Meeting, whether such payments have been made.

(2) The Conference affirms the principle, which has from the beginning been recognised in the administration of the Institution, in regard to charges on account of Students, that such

Students as have the means, or whose friends have the means, shall be expected to contribute, in whole or in part, according to their ability, towards the cost of their own maintenance and education, and directs the Committee to consider and adopt such methods as may be deemed best for carrying this rule into effect.

12. The Conference resolves that a proportion of the Missionary Candidates shall be trained in the Home Branches of the Theological Institution, and that any vacancies so created at Richmond shall be filled up with Candidates for the Home work, and directs that not more than one-third nor fewer than one-fourth, of the Candidates allocated in each year to the Richmond Branch shall be Candidates for the Home work, and that an equal number of Candidates for the Foreign work shall be distributed among the Home Branches, and that all Students for the Foreign work who, having completed their term may be placed on the list of reserve, shall be provided for at the Richmond Branch.

13. The Conference resolves that in all the Colleges, instruction be regularly given on the subject of the history and working of Christian Missions, and also on the history of non-Christian religious systems.

14. The Conference resolves that all Missionary Students shall, as far as possible, have three full years' training before entrance upon their work, that, where practicable, they shall be designated at the end of their second year, that the field of their future labours shall be kept in view in the instruction given them during the remainder of their residence, and that for such Students, wherever possible, elementary instruction in Medicine and handicrafts shall be provided.

15. That having regard to the special requirements of Students who may be intended for the East, the Conference resolves that such Students, after the completion of the usual course, shall, as far as may be found practicable, be allowed to remain in the Institution an additional year with a view to their instruction in subjects having direct reference to their intended work.

16. The Conference resolves that the time-table of each Branch shall be printed for the use of the Committee at its first meeting after Conference each year.

EDUCATION.

Q. XXX. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of **WESLEYAN EDUCATION** ?

A. 1. The Conference receives the Report of the proceedings of the Education Committee during the year, together with a Statistical Statement relating to Training Colleges, Day Schools, Sunday Schools, and the Connexional Sunday-School Union, and directs that an Abstract thereof be printed in the Minutes as an Appendix. (See Appendix, No. VIII.)

2. The thanks of the Conference are presented to the **REV. FREDERIC GREEVES, D.D.** to **MR. FREDERICK HOWARD**, and to **MR. WILLIAM VANNER**, for their services as Treasurers of the Education Fund.

3. The Conference re-appoints the **REV. FREDERIC GREEVES, D.D.**, **MR. FREDERICK HOWARD**, and **MR. WILLIAM VANNER**, to be Treasurers of the Education Fund. The special duty of **Mr. William Vanner** shall be the charge of the Sunday-School Union branch of the finance.

4. The **EDUCATION COMMITTEE** shall consist of the following persons, namely,—

5. The Conference directs that the following Resolutions, previously adopted, shall be reprinted:—

(1) The Conference empowers the Education Committee to make Grants, on inspection, to new Schools to which the provisions of the Minute of the Education Department, dated June 21st, 1878, apply, and for the probationary period during which, under the said Minute, such Schools cannot receive Grants in aid from the Department.

(2) The Conference expresses its opinion that, in view of the working of existing arrangements for Public Elementary Education, it is highly desirable that the number of Wesleyan Day Schools should at least be maintained. The Conference therefore strongly recommends that before any steps are taken towards the closing or transfer of any Wesleyan Day School, the proposal to close or transfer it be communicated to the Education Committee, in order that they may have an opportunity of suggesting alternative proposals for the consideration of Local Managers.

(3) The Conference directs that in all ordinary cases of Day-Schools conducted on Wesleyan Trust premises, no such Schools shall be discontinued so long as there is a reasonable prospect of their being carried on without serious embarrassment. The same general principle shall apply to Wesleyan Day Schools conducted in premises rented for the purpose under the management of a recognised Wesleyan School Committee.

When, however, the discontinuance of a Day School is proposed, before such proposal is carried into effect the Superintendent shall consult the Trustees, the Managing Committee, and the Subscribers ; and if in any case there is a considerable division of opinion, the case shall be submitted to the Quarterly Meeting of the Circuit. In all cases, the general principle laid down by the Conference respecting the Transfer of Schools—viz., that the Superintendents of the Circuits, with the Managers and Trustees acting in concert, shall consult the Education Committee—shall be adhered to.

(4) The Conference declares that it shall not be deemed to be within the power and option of a Superintendent to prevent the establishment or continuance of a Wesleyan Day School, so long as responsible parties pledge themselves to bear all the financial cost and risk.

(5) (i.) In view of the interpretation which is put upon Section XXXIII. of the Elementary Education Act by the Lords of the Committee of Council, to the effect that any transfer of a School, settled upon our School Model Deed No. I., to a School Board, for any term whatever, for the purposes of such School Board, must be sanctioned not only by the signatures of the Trustees, but by the Conference, testified by the President in writing, the Conference directs that in every case in which the transfer of such a School is proposed, the Superintendent, with the Managers and Trustees acting in concert, shall first consult the Education Committee on the subject, and that if, for reasons given, that Committee recommends such a transfer, the Rules of the Conference in relation to the sale of Trust Property shall be applicable thereto;—the Education Committee considering all questions affecting School management, and the Chapel Committee questions affecting Trust Property.

(ii.) In respect to Schools settled on the School Model Deed No. II., or on any other Deed in which the consent of the Conference is rendered necessary for the alienation of the property, the Conference recommends the Trustees to act upon

the same principles as those laid down in the foregoing clause in relation to Schools settled on the School Model Deed No. I.

(iii.) In all cases of transfer which may hereafter occur, the Conference recommends that provision be made in the instrument of transfer to secure the resumption of the premises by the Trustees, without their being required to reimburse any money laid out upon them by the School Board solely for its own purposes.

(6) The Conference directs all who are contemplating the erection or alteration of premises for the establishment of new Schools, to communicate with the Education Committee, for the purpose of receiving counsel as to their projected undertakings, and the adaptation of the premises to the system of instruction designed to be adopted.

(7) The Conference directs that the October Examination of Pupil Teachers in Religious Knowledge shall be held on the *last* Saturday of that month. The March Examination will continue to be held on the *first* Saturday of that month.

(8) The Conference directs that the Statistics of the Day and Sunday-Schools of each Circuit be read in the March Quarterly Meeting; but that if sufficient time be not then available for the discussion of the Statistics, and for inquiry into the state of the Schools, such discussion and inquiry shall take place in the June Quarterly Meeting.

(9) The Conference directs that the Education Schedules, having been duly filled up and presented to the March Quarterly Meeting, shall be sent by the Superintendents to the District Education Secretary, not later than April 20th, in each year.

(10) The Conference authorizes the observance of the third Sunday in October in each year as a day for Special Prayer on behalf of Sunday-schools and young people.

(11) The Conference resolves that while it may be well to provide a separate service for very young children, it is most undesirable that scholars of eight years of age and upwards should be kept from the services in the chapels.

6. The Conference directs that the District Sunday-School Sub-Committees shall have charge also of the interests of the Day-schools in their respective Districts.

7. 'The Conference resolves that No. V. of the General Rules of Sunday-Schools, printed in the *Minutes of Conference*, 1873, be re-worded as follows: "The Superintendent Minister of the Circuit shall preside in the Annual Meeting (Rule IV.), also in all Meetings of the Committee and in all Meetings of the Teachers. If at any one of the said meetings the Superintendent Minister be not present, one of the other Ministers of the Circuit shall preside. If either at an Annual Meeting or at a Meeting of the Committee, no Minister is present, the Meeting shall appoint one of the Officers of the Institution to act as its Chairman. If at any Teachers' Meeting no Minister is present, one of the Superintendents of the School shall preside"' (*Min.*, 1874, p. 443, 8vo edition).

MIDDLE-CLASS EDUCATION.

1. The Conference receives and adopts the Report of the Committee, and expresses its thankfulness for the success of the movement for Middle-Class Education.

2. The Conference receives with pleasure the favourable reports of the Schools at Jersey, Truro, Bury St. Edmunds, Woodhouse Grove, Trowbridge, Penzance, and Congleton.

3. The Rev. Edward Watson and the Rev. Richard Allen (B), are appointed Directors of the Cornwall Wesleyan-Methodist School Association, Limited. The Rev. Edward Watson and the Rev. Joseph Cranswick are appointed Directors of the Cornwall Wesleyan-Methodist Girls' School Association, Limited. The Rev. J. S. Jones and Mr. T. W. Pocock are appointed Directors of the East Anglian Wesleyan-Methodist School Association, Limited. The Rev. Marshall Hartley and Mr. W. Johnson are appointed Directors of the Woodhouse-Grove School Company, Limited. The Rev. J. B. James and the Rev. Nicholas Kelynack are appointed Directors of the Cheshire and North Staffordshire Wesleyan Middle-Class School

Association, Limited. The Rev. Thomas Haslam and Mr. John H. Mason are appointed Directors of the Western Counties Wesleyan-Methodist School Association, Limited. The Rev. S. Hutton and Sir George Hayter Chubb are appointed Directors of the Kent Wesleyan-Methodist School Association, Limited.

4. In view of the increasing demand for good intermediate Education, the Conference deems it highly expedient that further efforts should be made to establish Methodist Middle-Class Schools in different parts of the country, in order that the Connexion may take its due share in this important work.

6. The Committee is empowered to make appropriations by way of grant or loan, or otherwise, on account of the remainder of the sum of Ten Thousand Pounds, which was allotted from the Thanksgiving Fund in aid of Methodist Middle-Class Schools.

7. The Conference recommends the promoters of any projected Middle-Class School, which it is proposed to denominate a Wesleyan-Methodist School, to submit to this Committee the draft of the Trust Deed or Articles of Association of the School, for any suggestions which the Committee may deem it to be desirable to make.

8. The Conference directs the Committee :—

(i.) To consider schemes for the establishment of such Schools, when they are submitted to them, and to advise respecting such schemes as they may deem expedient.

(ii.) To report on such cases to the Conference.

(iii.) To act on behalf of the Conference, in the cases referred to, in the interval between one Conference and another.

(iv.) To present to the Conference annually any suggestions for the promotion of the interests of Methodist Middle-Class Education.

4. The Conference is gratified by hearing of the large number of children who, during the year, have left the Homes after due training, for situations in the United Kingdom and the Colonies; and is especially thankful that whilst with very few exceptions, the former inmates of the Home are living respectably, a large number of them give proof that they have received the Gospel in the love of it.

5. The Conference is gratified to learn that the debt of the Children's Home and Orphanage has been reduced during the year by £5,766, and that further donations to the extent of £1,860 have been promised, and earnestly hopes that the balance of about £2,000 debt unprovided for, may soon be met by further special donations.

6. In view of the great number and deplorable need of orphan, homeless, and uncared-for children, and the great

blessing that has attended efforts already made on behalf of this class—and especially in view of increased and multiplied Home-Missionary efforts to which the Children's Home is a needed and valuable auxiliary—the Conference earnestly repeats its commendation of this work to the liberality of the Methodist Societies, Congregations and Sunday-Schools, and of the Christian public at large.

7. The Conference approves of the Draft Deed now submitted, whereby the trusts declared by the Indentures of the 27th day of July, 1874, and the 14th day of December, 1876, respecting the 'Wheatsheaf' and 'Bonner Road' Children's Homes are proposed to be modified and altered, and directs that the modification and alteration of the said Indentures thereby effected be sanctioned accordingly.

8. The Conference hears with satisfaction that in connection with the Children's Home at Bonner Road, a Registry Office for servants is to be opened, and other arrangements made, to preserve girls and young women from peril; and strongly impressed with the great importance of the movement, recommends it to the sympathy and support of our people, and the hearty co-operation of our Ministers.

RELIGIOUS OBSERVANCE OF THE LORD'S DAY.

Q. XXXII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on receiving the Report of the Committee for Promoting the RELIGIOUS OBSERVANCE OF THE LORD'S DAY?

The Conference adopts the Report, and rejoices in the prospect of the speedy application to England of the wise and beneficent legislation in regard to the closing of public-houses on the Lord's Day, which has been followed by so many signal benefits in Scotland, Ireland, and Wales; but in view of the tendencies of modern thought and life, and in this critical

moment of public affairs, it commends the question of Sabbath observance and Sabbath defence to the more earnest and prayerful consideration of the Methodist people.

EXTENSION OF METHODISM IN GREAT BRITAIN.

Q. XXXIII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of the Fund for the **EXTENSION OF METHODISM IN GREAT BRITAIN** ?

A. 1. The Conference adopts the Report, and learns with satisfaction that during the past year the Committee have received and considered 114 applications for aid, and have made 91 Grants. The amount paid during the year for sites and Grants for Chapels was £7,059 10s. The total receipts during the year amounted to £6,034 18s. 8d. The sum promised was £47,470. The amount paid is £33,982 9s. 8d. Since the formation of the Fund there have been 1,187 Applications; 832 Grants, amounting to £64,590 12s. 6d.; and 134,331 additional sittings have been provided.

2. The Thanks of the Conference are presented to Mr. **WILLIAM MEWBURN**, and Mr. **ALEXANDER M'ARTHUR, M.P.**, the Treasurers, and the Committee, for their faithful and valuable services during the past year.

TEMPERANCE.

Q. XXXV. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of TEMPERANCE ?

1. The Conference receives and adopts the Report of the Temperance Committee, and directs that an Abstract thereof be printed in the Minutes. (See Appendix, No. X.)

2. The Conference hears with great satisfaction of the con-

stant and rapid growth of Wesleyan-Methodist Bands of Hope, which now number 8,133, and contain 318,357 enrolled members.

3. The Conference learns with concern that there are only 308 Wesleyan-Methodist Temperance Societies in Great Britain, and that the number is decreasing. The Conference instructs the Temperance Committee to call the special attention of Superintendents of Circuits, Circuit Quarterly Meetings, and May District Committees to this important department of Temperance work.

4. The Conference repeats its deep regret that no Bill has yet been passed to secure the Sunday Closing of Public-Houses in England. The Conference urges the Methodist people to use their influence with Members of Parliament and Candidates for Parliament, to secure this long and urgently needed boon at the earliest possible date.

5. The Conference recommends that on the second Sunday in December in each year special reference shall be made in all Wesleyan-Methodist places of worship, and in all Wesleyan Sunday-Schools, to the appalling extent and dire results of Intemperance in Great Britain.

4. The following suggestions and recommendations of the Committee appointed by the Conference of 1884 were referred to the Committee :—

(1) That the business of the Common Office in relation to the three Funds, viz., the Schools, Children's, and Theological

Institution, be the following business hitherto transacted by the General Treasurers of those Funds, viz., the receipt and financing of all Income, the keeping of all lists of subscriptions, etc., and the preparation of the annual Reports so far as they relate to finance.

(2) That for the present one banking account be kept with three sections, one for each Fund, all payments being made by the appointed Officers of the Funds.

(3) That the Office be under the control of the Officers of the three Funds, who shall be convened as often as may be decided to be necessary.

(4) That there be a periodical audit by a professional accountant, the periods to be determined by the Committee of Officers.

(5) That in addition to the above-named business, there shall be kept at the Office:—

(a) A register of all Special Funds and Trusts throughout the Connexion, with lists of Trustees, etc.

(b) A register of all reversionary and other interests in which the three Funds may be concerned, and also of all similar interests in which other Funds may be concerned, unless otherwise directed.

(6) That other Funds may in the future be included in the Common Office as may be found convenient.

(7) It is suggested that if possible an arrangement be made for the occupancy of a room at the Mission House as an office, or at any rate as a temporary office.

The Conference further resolves:—

1. That it is expedient to combine the cash of such of the Connexional Funds as the Conference shall approve in one banking account, divided into separate sections.

2. That the necessary arrangements for such a common banking account be under the direction and control of the Officers of the Funds concerned, who shall be convened once a month, or oftener if necessary, by a Convener to be appointed.

3. That the clerical work of the common banking account be transacted at the Common Office.

4. That it is desirable to include in this arrangement the following Funds, viz. :—Foreign Missions, Schools, Children's, Metropolitan Chapel Building, Home Mission, Auxiliary, Theological Institution, Education (not including Training College accounts), Extension of Methodism, Sunday-School Union, and Children's Home. And that the Committee on the work of the Common Office be directed to consider the details of the scheme, to communicate with the Committees of the several Funds concerned, a report from each committee being presented to the next Conference, and generally to advise the Conference on the subject.

ACCOUNTS OF CONNEXIONAL FUNDS.—The Committee of last year is re-appointed, with instructions to report upon all Funds and Trusts which are under the control of the Conference in its Representative Session; and also to inquire, as far as it may deem needful, concerning the condition and management of any Funds held in Trust for Methodist purposes, and to prepare a list of the same. The following is the Committee :—The Ex-President of the Conference, the Rev. J. Ernest Clapham, Walford Green, Theophilus Woolmer; with Messrs. Henry J. Atkinson, M.P., T. Morgan Harvey, Thomas W. Pocock, and Thomas C. Squance. The Rev. George W. Olver, B.A., is Convener.

METHODISM IN SOUTH WALES.—1. The Conference adopts the Report of the Committee, and directs that an Abstract of it be printed in the Minutes. (See Appendix, No. VII.)

2. The Conference accepts the Resolution of the Committee,—That it does not see its way, at present, to initiate any movement for the establishment of a Methodist Middle-Class School for South Wales.

3. The following Committee is appointed to watch the interests of Methodism in South Wales, and to report to the next Conference :—The Chairmen of the Bristol, Swansea and South

Wales Districts, with two Ministers and three Laymen from the Bristol and the Swansea Districts, and three Ministers and four Laymen from the South Wales District, who shall be elected by the several Financial District Meetings, together with the Rev. Dr. Rigg, Samuel Davies, John W. Greeves, Henry J. Pope, Joseph Hargreaves, George Bowden, Lancelot Railton, and John A. B. Harry, Convener.

4. The following shall be an Executive Committee, who shall act under the larger Committee, viz. :—The Chairmen of the Swansea, South Wales, and Bristol Districts, the Officers of the Fund, with one Minister and one Layman from each of these three Districts, who shall be elected by the September District Meetings from amongst those who shall be chosen to serve upon the General Committee.

N.B.—Officers of the South Wales, etc., Extension Fund.
Treasurers :—Messrs. Lewis Davis (Ferndale) and Lewis Williams (Cardiff). *Secretaries* :—Rev. David Young and Lancelot Railton, from whom any information on the work of the Fund may be obtained.

CUSTODY OF CONNEXIONAL DOCUMENTS.—The Conference receives the Report of the Committee on the Custody of Connexional Documents, and re-appoints the Committee, repeating its instructions of 1882. (See Minutes, 1882, p. 287.) The President and Secretary of the Conference, the Ex-President, the Rev. Dr. Osborn, Dr. Rigg, Marmaduke C. Osborn, Theophilus Woolmer, David J. Waller, and J. Ernest Clapham; with Messrs. John W. Gabriel, T. Morgan Harvey, William Johnson, and W. Willmer Pocock, are the Committee. Dr. Williams is re-appointed Custodian and Registrar, and also Convener of the Committee.

SOCIAL PURITY.—1. The Conference adopts the Report of the Committee.

2. The following are appointed a Committee to deal with the subject :—The President and Secretary of the Conference,

the Rev. Joseph Bush, J. Richard Hargreaves, Hugh P. Hughes, M.A., Ebenezer E. Jenkins, M.A., Charles H. Kelly, George W. Olver, B.A., Dr. Osborn, Allen Rees, Dr. Rigg; with Messrs. Henry J. Atkinson, M.P., John Beauchamp, J. R. Bedwell, T. Percival Bunting, Percy W. Bunting, T. Morgan Harvey, George Lidgett, and Sir Wm. M'Arthur, M.P. The Rev. Hugh Price Hughes, M.A., the Rev. Allen Rees, and Mr. Percy W. Bunting are appointed Secretaries of the Committee.

3. The Committee is authorised to put itself into communication with the several other bodies which pursue the same object in a religious spirit.

4. The same Committee is also authorised to carry on the work of the Wesleyan Society for Abolishing the Regulation of Vice by the State, and the Treasurer of that Society is authorised to pay over the balance in his hands to the Treasurer of the above Committee. Mr. Percy W. Bunting is appointed the Treasurer.

5. The Conference renews its solemn protest against the Contagious Diseases Acts, as being iniquitous in principle and demoralising in tendency, and earnestly presses for their early and complete repeal.

6. The Conference desires to place on record its intense sympathy with the movement for the protection of young girls, and for the suppression of the trade in licentiousness; also to express its conviction that the only effectual remedy is to secure such changes in law and public opinion as will recognise the same standard of morality as binding upon both sexes; and until such changes in public sentiment and law shall have taken place, the Conference records its grateful satisfaction at the large and important step taken in the right direction by the passing of the Criminal Law Amendment Bill.

RE-ARRANGEMENT OF THE BOUNDARIES OF THE MACCLESFIELD DISTRICT.—The Conference adopts the following recommendation of the Committee: That until a scheme commanding general agreement can be formulated, which would give to the

Macclesfield District full compensation for the transfer to other Districts of the Circuits in question, no change whatever be made.

OLD CHAPELS IN LARGE TOWNS.—The following Resolutions were adopted :

1. The Conference rejoices to find, on inquiry, that the number of 'Old Chapels in Large Towns, with decreasing congregations,' is not proportionately as large as was generally supposed; but it is strongly of opinion that the condition of many is so grave as to demand immediate and thorough consideration.

2. That in respect of Chapels, in which the congregations have greatly decreased, although surrounded by populations which are, for the most part, destitute and degraded, the Conference is of opinion that the sale of such Chapels should be resorted to only in exceptional circumstances; that the Public Services in such Chapels, especially on Sunday evenings, should be adapted to the requirements of the people, and that a larger number of free seats, comfortable and easily accessible, should be provided; and that more practical interest should be shown in the domestic and social well-being of the people in the neighbourhood of such Chapels.

3. That the Minister appointed to take charge of any such Chapel shall concentrate his labours upon that particular Chapel, and that such labours shall be supplemented by suitable and sufficient Lay agency.

5. The Committee is directed to continue its work in endeavouring to devise means whereby Chapels now partially or almost entirely deserted may become successful Mission Chapels, such cases to be regarded as experimental cases; and it is further directed to meet early in the year, so as to afford opportunity for consulting the Quarterly Meetings of the Circuits concerned.

6. That considering there are in the Connexion a considerable number of old Chapels with congregations, which, though large, are decreasing year by year, and which must inevitably continue to decrease, unless some means are devised whereby the process of decay can be arrested, the Conference directs the Committee to include this class of Chapels within its range of inquiry.

ALLAN LIBRARY.—For the Resolutions of the Conference as to the Allan Library, see Section III., p. 269.

METHODIST TRUST ASSURANCE COMPANY.—The Conference is gratified with the success of the Methodist Trust Assurance Company, which has already contributed the sum of £1,200 to the Auxiliary Fund. The Conference is also gratified to learn

that the Company has resolved to increase its reserve capital to £50,000, and confidently commends this generous Institution.

DIVISION OF CIRCUITS.—The Conference resolves that a Committee be appointed to consider the Resolutions as to the Division of Circuits which were provisionally adopted by the Conference of 1882, and to advise the Conference as to whether it is desirable to continue to suspend the final confirmation of any part of the Resolutions with a view to special reconsideration, in order that all such portions of the Resolutions as require no such reconsideration may be confirmed at the next Conference.

VISIT OF BISHOP HIRST.—The Conference accords a respectful and affectionate welcome to the Rev. John F. Hirst, D.D., Bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church; and having listened with pleasure to his brotherly and eloquent address, takes this opportunity of renewing its assurance of affectionate regard for the Church of which he is so distinguished a representative.

DEATH OF GENERAL GRANT.—The Conference remembering that at the present moment our brethren of the American nation are engaged in the funeral services of the late General Grant, who was so eminently serviceable in the hands of Divine Providence in preserving the unity of that great nation which now mourns for him, desires to present its respectful condolence to the bereaved family which has lost an affectionate husband and father, the Methodist Church, which has lost an attached adherent, and the nation, which has lost a great soldier and citizen.

THE 'ALLAN LIBRARY.'

The following Report of the Committee of the 'ALLAN LIBRARY' is adopted by the Conference:—

The Committee has met on seven occasions during the year.

The following Ministers and Gentlemen have been added to its number, viz.: The Rev. Richard Roberts, Dr. Williams, Alexander M'Aulay, Walford Green, Joseph Bush, Featherstone Kellett, J. Ernest Clapham, and George W. Olver, B.A.; Sir William M'Arthur, M.P., Messrs. John B. Ingle, Sir George Hayter Chubb, and Robert W. Perks.

The Books are insured in the Phoenix Fire Office for £10,000 at 2s. 6d. %. Subscriptions were promised by Ministers at the last Conference amounting to £282 7s. 0d.

An account has been opened at the City Bank in the name of the Treasurer, the Rev. Theophilus Woolmer.

The Committee has been anxiously engaged in the endeavour to provide accommodation for the Library.

At the first meeting of the Committee it was agreed that for various reasons it was undesirable, and indeed impossible, to find the needed accommodation in the Centenary Hall. The Committee has been in negotiation with the Trustees of City Road Chapel, with a view to the purchase of a site on their premises; and the erection thereon of a permanent building for the Library; but unfortunately the Committee and the Trustees were unable to come to terms, and the negotiations were

reluctantly abandoned. For the present the Books are under the care of the Book-Steward, at the Conference Office, a large number of them having been unpacked, and arranged upon shelves provided for the purpose.

The Conference having resolved that, although (in accordance with the wishes of the Donor) all Ministers and Preachers on Trial shall in the first place have right of access to the Library when established, subject to such regulations as shall hereafter be determined, persons other than Ministers shall also be admitted to the benefit of the Library, under certain necessary regulations; the Committee has further resolved that it is desirable to make arrangements by which the full benefit of the Library may not be confined to Ministers and others resident in London, but extended throughout the Connexion. The difficulties however which have prevented the Committee from acquiring any site for the erection of Library Buildings, have so occupied its attention during the year, as to prevent it from maturing any plans for carrying out this object.

As instructed and authorised by the Conference, the Committee have directed the preparation of a Trust Deed, which is now ready for execution. The following Ministers and Gentlemen have consented to act as Trustees:—

SECTION V.

STANDING ORDERS.

1. The Annual Meetings of the several District Committees shall be held between the 9th and 16th of May, 1886, with the exception of those of the North Wales, South Wales, Lincoln, Isle of Man, Edinburgh and Aberdeen, and Zetland Districts.

2. *Names and Addresses of Circuit Stewards.*—The Superintendents of Circuits are required to furnish the Chairman of the District with the names and addresses of the Circuit Stewards immediately after the December Quarterly Meeting; and, immediately after the March Quarterly Meeting, with the name and address of any gentleman elected to attend the May District Meeting in the place of any Circuit Steward declaring his inability to attend such District Meeting.

3. *Admission of Members.*—Mistakes having occasionally arisen respecting the meaning of the Rule of 1797 on the subject of the admission of persons who are on trial as Members of our Society, the Conference deems it necessary to repeat the statement, That it never was intended that the names of all those who are on trial should be laid before a Leaders' Meeting for distinct and formal discussion; but solely, that if there be, in the opinion of a Leader, any reasonable objection to the character and conduct of any person who is on trial, such objection may be stated by him; and that, if the validity of the objection be established to the satisfaction of the Meeting, a Member's Ticket shall not be given to the person so objected to, at the Quarterly Visitation.

4. *Trial of Members.*—When a charge is brought against any Member resident in a place where no Leaders' Meeting is statedly held, the case shall be referred for investigation to the Leaders' Meeting of the principal Society in the Circuit Town.

The Leader or Leaders, and the Society Stewards, of the Society of which the accused is a Member, shall be associated with the Leaders' Meeting for the purposes of the investigation.

If the accused person is a *Trustee*, then there shall also be associated with the Leaders' Meeting, as above constituted, the Trustees of the Chapel with which the Society of which he is a Member is connected; or, if there is no such Chapel, then the Trustees of the Chapel in connection with the principal Society in the Circuit Town. But no Trustee shall, in either case, be so associated, unless he is himself a Member of Society in the same Circuit.

5. *Attendance of Ministers at Official Meetings.*—Mistakes having arisen on this subject, the Conference deems it proper and necessary to declare, that all the Ministers and Preachers on Trial appointed to a Circuit have a constitutional right to take part as members in our Leaders' Meetings, and in all other official meetings of the Circuits to which they are appointed.

6. *Probationers and the Lord's Supper.*—The Conference, having been informed that, in several Circuits, the Preachers on Trial have very rarely an opportunity of receiving the Lord's Supper, resolves that, in compliance with a former injunction on this subject, the Superintendents be required to make the necessary arrangements, in their Circuit-Plans, for securing to their junior Colleagues proper facilities for partaking of this Holy Sacrament.

7. *Resolutions on Pastoral Work.*—The Conference directs that the 'Resolutions,' as far as the words 'counted for a forest,' be read in the stead of the 'Liverpool Minutes' at each Annual District Meeting, and at the Ministers' Meeting of each Circuit in September. And the Chairmen of Districts are directed to make enquiry concerning the due observance of this regulation.

The Conference further resolves that a copy of the 'Resolutions on Pastoral Work' be presented, under the direction of the Chairman of each District, to every Preacher on trial on his first appointment to a Circuit.

8. *Supply of Vacancies.*—Instances having occurred in which Superintendents and other Ministers needing Circuit-supplies on occasion of sickness and various casualties, have applied to the President of the Conference, without *first* taking counsel with the Chairman of the District; the Conference directs the brethren to return to the old plan of first communicating with the Chairman in every such case, who is also directed to satisfy himself, by personal enquiry, that a local supply cannot be obtained.

9. *Reading of the Pastoral Address.*—The Superintendents are directed to appoint special Society Meetings, to be held at the principal Chapels in their Circuits, for the purpose of having the Pastoral Address read, and made the subject of suitable remarks and exhortations.

10. *Recognition of New Members.*—The public and formal Recognition of New Members of Society is in accordance with early Methodist usage. A public welcome given by the Society tends to encourage the New Members, whilst the formal recognition will deepen their sense of responsibility. Such recognition might be associated with the administration of the Lord's Supper; or it might be found expedient to recognise New Members at a Society-meeting after the Quarterly Visitation of the Classes; or, in villages, a Recognition Service might take the place of a week-evening service. The Conference, therefore, directs that, from time to time, meetings for the Recognition of New Members be held, as far as practicable, in every Circuit, subject to the discretion of the Superintendent as to the frequency and exact nature of such meetings. These Returns of the Members in the Society are to be forwarded, immediately after the May District Meetings, to the REV. JOHN W. GREEVES, *Wesleyan Centenary Hall, Bishopsgate Street Within, London, E.C.*

11. That with a view of securing more correct returns from Sunday-Schools, it is an instruction to the Secretary or Secretaries of each School that, wherever practicable, the Schedule of Returns be submitted to the Local Committee

before such Returns are presented to the Circuit Quarterly Meeting.

12. *Annual Return of Members.*—The number of Members in the Society, and of persons admitted on trial, as taken at the March Quarterly Visitation in each year, and reported at the District Meetings, shall be the number returned on the Minutes of the following Conference.

13. *Examination of Pupil-Teachers.*—The Conference directs that the Annual Examination of Pupil-Teachers in Religious Knowledge shall be held on the last Saturday in October and on the first Saturday in March; that the questions shall be prepared by the General Committee; that the Examination shall be held, either in the several Circuits by the Superintendent Ministers or their Colleagues, or at suitable places for Central District Examinations, as may be determined by the September District Meetings, and agreed to by the respective School Committees; and that the written answers shall be forwarded to the General Secretary, and shall be valued by a Central Board of Examiners to be elected by the General Committee. The Conference further recommends that, in connection with Central Examinations, Meetings of Teachers and Pupil-Teachers be held under the direction of the Chairman of the District and the District Educational Secretary.

14. *Quarterly Fast-Days.*—The days upon which the Quarterly Fast, appointed by Rule, is to be observed throughout the Connection, for the following year, are, Fridays, September 25th, and December 18th, 1885, March 26th, and June 25th, 1886.

15. *Discipline of Methodism.*—The Chairmen of Districts are enjoined to make particular enquiries at their Annual Meetings in reference to all the points of Discipline specified in the first Article of the Answer to Q. XXVIII. in the Minutes of 1825.

16. *Candidates for Admission on Trial.*—(1) Those Preachers who are recommended for Admission on Trial shall preach in the presence of at least three of the Ministers of the District

Committee, (at or about the time of its Annual Meeting in May,) to be selected by the Chairman, exclusive of the Superintendent by whom the Candidates respectively are proposed; and a special report of the Sermons shall be made in the District Meeting, and immediately forwarded in writing to the Secretaries of the Committee for the Examination of Candidates.

(2) The Conference directs that arrangements shall be made by the May District Meetings for the hearing of each Candidate by one Minister of the District, in addition to those who have heard him before his recommendation by the District Committee, such Minister to forward his Report to the General Secretaries of the Examination Committee.

17. *Preachers on Trial.*—Whenever it shall be found to be practicable, Preachers on Trial shall preach during the District Meetings.

18. *Candidates for Ordination.*—The Conference directs that Candidates for Ordination shall, at or before the May District Meeting, preach before three Ministers of the District, who shall report to the Meeting.

19. *Returns of the Military.*—The Chairmen of Districts are directed to inquire of the Superintendents of Circuits in which troops are marched to Divine service in our chapels, the average number of non-commissioned officers and men in attendance, distinguishing the number of Members in Society. These returns must include, also, the actual number of soldiers who are declared Wesleyan-Methodists. The returns given are to be recorded in the District Minutes. If there be no military attendance in the District, a note to that effect shall be inserted.

20. *Home-Missionary Ministers.*—The Conference directs that a special inquiry shall be made at the May District Meetings, whether the Regulations for the employment of Home-Missionary Ministers, adopted by the Conference, have been faithfully observed in the Circuits to which Home-Missionary Ministers are appointed; and that a Report in each case shall be made to the Conference.

21. *Juvenile Home and Foreign Missionary Associations.*—In

the case of Circuits which are not in a position to ask for the appointment of a Home-Missionary Minister, and to give the pledge required, but which feel the necessity of adopting some plan of *Home-Missionary* operations, the subjoined allocation is allowed:—One-third of the sums received to be paid to the Funds of the Foreign Missionary Society, it being expressly understood that in every case the contribution to the Foreign Missions shall be at least equal to what has been presented from Christmas Offerings, on the average of several preceding years; one-third to the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund; one-third to the Circuit, to be expended in support of local movements of a directly *Home-Missionary* character, under the direction of the Superintendent, and of a Committee to be appointed at the December Quarterly Meeting (See Minutes, 1863 and 1877).

22. *Lay-Members of District Committees.*—The Chairmen of Districts shall be required to send a circular to the Lay-Members of the District Committee, requesting their attendance on the Wednesday, and, if necessary, on the Thursday, in the week of the Annual District Meeting, specifying the business that will be brought forward, and particularly mentioning any subject that may have been specially remitted by the Conference to the consideration of such Meeting. A similar circular shall be prepared and sent with reference to the Financial District Meeting.

23. *Representative to the Stationing Committee.*—The Minister who shall be the Representative of any District to the Stationing Committee shall be chosen by the united votes of the Ministers and Laymen who are members of the District Committee.

24. *Division of Circuits.*—Before District Committees consent to the division of any Circuit, enquiry must be made whether due attention has been paid to satisfactory arrangements for the Trust-Estates affected by the proposed division, especially in reference to any debts existing thereon.

25. *Boundaries of Circuits.*—Whereas difficulties have arisen from the want of accurate and recorded definitions of the

boundaries of Circuits, the Conference directs that, in future, the boundaries of Circuits which are divided shall be fully stated in the Minutes of the District-Meeting to which they belong, and that the Secretary of the District shall send a copy of the record to be inserted in the Minutes of the Quarterly Meetings of the Circuits concerned; and that, in such cases, copies of the Ordnance maps, or some other maps, of the localities concerned, be coloured, so as to show the boundaries, and deposited in the safes provided for the custody of the Trust-Deeds of the Circuits. The Conference further directs that these arrangements be made in all cases of alteration in the boundaries of existing Circuits.

26. *Minor District Meetings.*—In all cases in which the holding of a Minor District Meeting is rendered necessary, such Meeting, except under the Regulation passed by the Conference in 1840, (*Minutes*, Vol. IX., p. 94,) shall be held in the District in which the accused party resides, the accused and the accuser selecting respectively two Ministers from the said District, who, with the Chairman thereof, shall constitute the Minor District Meeting.

Should either party refuse or decline to choose two Ministers, to act as members of the Meeting, the Chairman is empowered and directed to nominate them so that the number required by Rule may be made up.

27. *District Minutes.*—The Chairmen of Districts are required to procure *three* complete copies of the Minutes of the several Annual and other Meetings of the District Committees, transcribed according to the order of time in which such Meetings shall have been held, and duly signed by the Chairman and Secretary. One of these copies shall be inserted in the District Records; a second shall be reserved for the use of the Chairman and Financial Secretary at the Conference; and a third shall be sent to the REV. DAVID J. WALLER, *Wesleyan Training College, Westminster, S. W.*, not later than June 21st, and delivered by him to the President during the first week of each Conference, to be preserved under his direction, as a document appertaining to the Connexion. The several copies of the last class shall be

written on foolscap paper, that they may be annually bound together in one volume.

28. *Schedules from Departments.*—As it is obviously desirable that the Committees appointed by the Conference to manage the several departments of the business of the Connexion, in the intervals of its Session, should be furnished with as much statistical information as possible on the matters of business severally confided to their care, the Conference authorises them, through their appointed Officers, to send, when they deem it expedient, suitable Circulars and Schedules to the Superintendents, or to the Chairmen of Districts, as the case may require; and directs the Superintendents and Chairmen duly to return such Schedules properly filled up.

29. *Elections to Departmental Offices.*—The Conference resolves that in any new appointment to a Departmental Office, the Minister elected shall have a clear majority of the total number of votes cast; and that when such majority is not obtained on the first ballot, a second ballot shall be taken on the first two, or if necessary, the first three names on the list which have the largest number of votes.

30. *Committee on Appeals and other Cases.*—At each Conference, the President shall nominate, not later than the second day, a Committee of twenty-one members of the Conference, to whom shall be referred, without discussion, all cases requiring further inquiry touching the character of Ministers or Preachers on Trial, immediately after the reading of the Minutes of District Committees thereupon, or of any notice of charge or appeal relating thereto, or for any reason which the Conference may deem sufficient.

Any complainant or appelland, or any person under inquiry, may object to one in three of the members of the said Committee sitting on his case; and the President shall then appoint some other member of the Conference to act instead of the member so objected to.

Special Cases to be decided upon by the Conference may be referred to the whole Committee; but it shall, for ordinary

purposes, be divided into three sections, for each of which a Convener shall be appointed, who shall be responsible for preparing the business of the Committee.

31. *Lay-Members of Connexional Committees.*—In respect to the several Committees of the Connexional Funds, the Conference resolves, that a certain number of Lay Gentlemen, being at least one-sixth of the number of Lay Members of each Departmental Committee, shall annually retire from each Committee by rotation, the same persons being ineligible for immediate re-appointment, except in special cases, and after nomination for such re-appointment by the vote of four-fifths of the Members of the Committee present.

32. *Preparations for the Stationing Committee.*—The Representative of each District shall send to the Secretary of the Conference, not later than the 27th day of June in each year, upon a Schedule to be provided by him, complete lists of (1) the arrangements provisionally made for the Stationing of Ministers in his District, (2) the invitations accepted by Ministers in his District to Circuits in other Districts, and (3) all Ministers in his District for whom no arrangement has been made;—from these lists the Secretary of the Conference shall compile, and cause to be printed in a convenient form for use in the Stationing Committee, one complete list of all arrangements thus provisionally made, and a separate list of all Ministers for whom provisional arrangements have not been made; and a copy of these lists shall be sent to each member of the Stationing Committee at least seven days before the meeting of that Committee.

33. *Conference Plan.*—The Superintendents of those Circuits in which the Conference may, from year to year, assemble, shall, with the previous approbation of the President, (as already required by Rule,) complete and print, not later than the 15th day of June in each year, a Plan of the order of preaching in the principal chapels during the Session of the Conference; and shall also, on or before the above date, inform every person they have appointed to preach in those chapels, of the

time and place of such appointment. And in order that the Plan thus prepared may not be violated, to the disappointment of our friends, and to the great inconvenience of other parties concerned, no Minister who attends the Conference shall be at liberty to make an engagement to preach in any other Circuit, either on the Sabbath, or on any other day, during the period appointed for the meeting of the Conference, at the time for which his name shall be inserted on the Conference Plan.

34. *Isle of Man District*.—It shall be a part of the business of the Financial District Meeting of the Isle of Man District to call the attention of Superintendents, and other Ministers who may be responsible, to the Regulations as to the duty of making certain Quarterly Returns to the Registrar-General of the Island, according to the provisions of the 'Dissenters' Marriage Act Amendment Act, 1885,' of the Isle of Man.

The humble Petition of the Conference of the People called Methodists, in the Connexion established by the late Rev. J. Wesley, A.M., assembled in their annual Session, at Newcastle-on-Tyne. This Petition sheweth that your petitioners regard with great dissatisfaction and regret the existing law for the protection of young girls, which now practically ceases at the age of thirteen years. In the interests of religion and morality they deem it highly desirable that the limit should be extended upwards. They consider it unreasonable to allow young girls liberty to part with their most precious possession at an age when they would not be allowed to dispose of their property, and they rely on increasing intelligence to create a public opinion which shall remedy this state of things; but until such opinion shall have been created, your petitioners do earnestly entreat your honourable House to fix the age of consent at not less than eighteen years. They are also strongly of opinion that the right to enter suspected places, as provided in clause 6 of the Bill before your honourable House, should on no account be withdrawn or weakened, and that the clauses relating to procuration should not contain any provisions exempting any persons from their operation. And your petitioners will ever pray.

THE ANNUAL ADDRESS
OF THE
CONFERENCE TO THE METHODIST SOCIETIES.

DEAR BRETHREN,—

We are thankful to have been permitted once more to assemble in our yearly Conference to take counsel together concerning the work entrusted to us by our Lord and Head. The Spirit of God has been in our midst, quickening our devotions, and searching and chastening our thoughts, giving us a deepened love towards each other, and making us yet more 'affectionately desirous' of you, whose 'servants' we are 'for Jesus' sake.' As we doubt not that you have been with us in spirit, 'helping together by prayer for us,' so, we may assure you, our hearts have been with you, 'making mention of you in our prayers, and giving thanks to God upon every remembrance of you.'

We rejoice to think that the bond which unites us as pastors and people abides in undiminished sanctity and strength. There is no desire on our part or on yours to exaggerate our office on the one hand, or to degrade it on the other. We repudiate alike the notion of exercising priestly mediation between the Lord and His people, and that of being mere agents of civilization and social order. We claim nothing more or less than to be 'accounted' of as 'the ministers of Christ, and stewards of the mysteries of God.' To be 'ministers by whom ye believed, even as the Lord gave to every man,' is honour enough; to watch over you in the Lord, 'not as having dominion over your faith, but as helpers of your joy,' is burden enough for us; but the honour and the burden are from the Lord, and our sufficiency is of Him. We desire to interpret

our duties toward you in no formal or narrow spirit, but to embrace all the opportunities of ministering to your welfare in Christ that it may please God to disclose. And in this endeavour we are continually encouraged by proofs of your confidence and affection. Continue, dear brethren, thus to think of us. Your love will make our labours light. Your prayers on our behalf will be heard; and we will again 'give ourselves to prayer and to the ministry of the word,' nothing doubting that you will be 'our hope,' and 'joy' and 'crown of rejoicing . . . in the presence of our Lord Jesus Christ at His coming.'

In the review of the past year we find abundant cause for thankfulness to God. There has been peace throughout our borders. In doctrine, discipline, administration, we have been free from strife. In every department of our work there has been a cheerful activity, never, we think, surpassed among us. The pastor, the teacher, the evangelist have sought to make full proof of their ministry. Without slackening in the accustomed round of Circuit and Connexional effort, much has been attempted in other ways to win souls to Christ, and to nourish and develop Christian life. In most of the chief centres of population Missions have been conducted on a large scale, and with encouraging success. Conventions for Christian edifying have been the means of strengthening and enriching the spiritual life of numbers of our people in various parts of the country. Agencies for maintaining the conflict with evil, and extending the kingdom of Christ, have increased in number and importance, and, we trust, in efficiency. The work of education among us is continually assuming larger proportions, and giving rise to new undertakings. It employs the services of many of our most devoted labourers, and yields ever-increasing results. The cause of Foreign Missions we still regard as a sacred trust which nothing must be allowed to displace or disparage. Our opportunities have increased more rapidly than our power to embrace them; but the past year has witnessed no retreat, and, in some parts of the great field, an appreciable advance. In the cause of temperance, morality and practical philanthropy, we have sought to follow the guidance of God, and the obvious requirements of the existing social order; and we have been led in various instances to undertake fresh responsibilities, and to devise new modes

of operation. Our contribution to Christian literature is not inconsiderable; and, though still below what we desire it to be, we rejoice to think that, while ministering in the first place to the requirements of our own people, it serves the wider interests of religion and virtue.

This brief mention of some of the chief forms of Christian activity among us will suggest what a more detailed statement would still more clearly show—namely, that our work as a Church is becoming more and more complex and varied. It is neither our fault nor our merit that our work to-day presents more aspects, and includes a greater variety of means and methods, than in past days. In common with all other Evangelical Churches, we find ourselves pressed on every side by evils with which we must grapple, by problems which we must at least attempt to solve. The original commission to preach the Gospel, which appears at first so simple, breaks up into innumerable commands and discloses innumerable duties, when we surrender ourselves to its direction, and seek to fulfil it amid the actual conditions of the world's life. It compels us to take account of the state of things social, moral and religious, not only in a general way, but with a careful attention to detail, and to adjust our efforts to the attainment of many particular ends. Hence the division and subdivision of Christian work, and the multiplying of organizations philanthropic and religious. There is, undoubtedly, some danger of a hurrying, eager, undevout activity, and we shall do well to guard against it by that communion with God which calms and purifies the busiest worker; but that danger is not sufficient to excuse us from the service to which we are called. For a long time to come we can have little to do with leisure. We must be busy members of a busy Church, until 'the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough places plain; and the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all flesh shall see it together.'

While rejoicing over the wide and varied range of Christian service in which we have been permitted to engage, we find no ground whatever for boasting or self-complacency. The extension of our work, and the measure of success with which it has been crowned, cannot conceal from us the fact that, in effectiveness in securing the highest ends, it falls far short of what may be reasonably hoped. We have again to call your attention to the disproportion between the number of new members received

during the year, and the net increase reported at its close. Of the former there have been during the year no fewer than 49,554. This number, including persons of all ages and classes, in town and country, represents, in part, the quiet growth of the Church's life, the harvest of the family, the school, and the Christian congregation; and is, in part, the result of evangelistic and missionary labour amongst those that are without. Nor have we made haste to enrol as members those who have been awakened. We have always regarded a period of probation for Church-membership as a wise and necessary part of our discipline, and our statistics assure us that this safeguard to a serious and deliberate adoption of the Christian confession has not been neglected. Nevertheless, the large addition just named is so far balanced by losses and wasting in our Societies, that the net increase of members on the year is only 2,797. After making all allowances for losses that may be regarded as natural and unavoidable, these figures disclose a state of things that causes grave concern.

Must we still suffer a yearly loss of many thousands of our members by their removal from one part of the country to another? Is the privilege of membership set so low, are its duties held so light, that a change of residence suffices to bring it to an end? How slight, how precarious a hold of the Christian vocation is here revealed! We must not shrink, dear brethren, from inquiring how it is that our success in winning souls is so largely qualified by our failure to retain them in Christian fellowship. If it be from lack of pastoral oversight, or for want of a deeper and more nourishing ministry of the Word, we will, by God's help, do our utmost to repair this deficiency. And we earnestly invite you, in your various spheres of influence and labour, to co-operate with us in this matter. None must be lost from among us whom it is possible by watchfulness and patience to retain. The sick must be visited, the poor must be cared for, the young must be looked after, the busy and tempted must be made to feel that they are remembered by their brethren, and not be abandoned to the influences that would detach them from the Communion of Saints. Special efforts may be necessary for the instruction and training of converts, young in years and unacquainted with the duties and responsibilities of a professedly Christian life. In some cases much wisdom will be required, and perhaps even

more of sympathy, if those who have been converted—large numbers together—in times of revival, are to be preserved to the Church, and trained to stability and usefulness in the cause of Christ. But if such persons have much to learn, as regards Christian truth and service, it must not be supposed that they have everything to receive, and nothing to impart to those with whom they enter into fellowship. They often bring into the Church a simplicity of faith and a warmth of love and zeal that are of great price; and the Church that wisely cares for her converts will find her own life deepened and enlarged.

Our work amongst the young continues steadily to increase, and to fill us with thankfulness and hope. The number of scholars in our Sunday-schools is 862,279, being an increase of 9,820 on the year. Of these, no fewer than 105,123 are members of our Society, or on trial,—an increase of 3,124 on the year. It will be seen that the latter increase is, relatively, larger than the former, and this has now been the case for several years past. While the number of scholars has increased some 22 per cent. in the last ten years, the number of scholars who are members of Society has increased 52 per cent. During the same time the entire increase throughout the Connexion has been a little under 27 per cent. The significance of these facts is very great. They show that our Societies are mainly recruited from the children and young people trained in our schools, and that the increase from this source has been nearly twice as great in proportion as the whole increase, and nearly two-and-a-half times as great as the increase in the number of scholars. We thankfully accept this proof of the growing efficiency of our Sunday-schools in securing the spiritual welfare of the young. They are becoming more and more, what they are often called, 'the nurseries of the Church.' In this direction our work as a Church presents perhaps its most hopeful and inviting aspect. It is certain that in this country there are more than a million children and young persons under our care. May we not boldly claim them all for Christ? We know what the will of the Lord concerning them is. Let us not sanction the false and hurtful notion that early decision for Christ is not to be looked for—is not, indeed, desirable. This notion has already wrought incalculable mischief. The way has been left open for a thousand evil influences to gather strength, the 'convenient season' has been still postponed,

and the lives that should have been brought to the Saviour in their morning have, in numberless instances, passed through a wasted noonday to a dark and perilous eventide.

The total number of members in Great Britain, as reported to this Conference, is 413,163; members on trial 30,861; in Junior Society-classes, 44,423: total, 488,447. Of this number two out of every nine are Sunday scholars.

We desire, dear brethren, to call your attention to another matter which is of vital concern to us as a Church. The supply of candidates for the Ministry is at once a test of the spiritual life existing among us, and a necessary condition of its maintenance and extension. We need not labour to convince you that the minister of Christ cannot be superseded in his work and office by any other class of Christian worker. In all our multiplication of agencies there is nothing that tends in this direction. The highest aspect of service in the Church of Christ is that of the minister 'separated unto the Gospel of God,' the 'steward' of His 'mysteries,' and the pastor of His flock; and it touches our very life that the succession of faithful men, called of God to this office, 'separated unto the Gospel of God,' should not fail. We venture to ask whether this matter has its proper place in the thoughts and prayers of our people. Your own spiritual well-being, and that of your children, is largely bound up with the existence among us of an earnest and faithful Ministry, abounding in all spiritual gifts, and adequately equipped for the defence and confirmation of the Gospel in the face of its adversaries. But the Church must bring forth her own Ministry. It is the test of her fruitfulness, as a 'tree yielding fruit, whose seed is in itself, after its kind.' The harvest of her consecrated youth is the crown of her fruitfulness, the proof and vindication of her patient husbandry, and her best offering to the Lord of the Harvest. The candidates for the Ministry this year are ninety in number. But in view of the requirements of the work at home and abroad that number might well have been increased. The claims of the mission-field especially are pressing heavily upon us. The heathen world is accessible at almost every point: our missions in the East, in Western and Southern Africa, and on the Continent of Europe are well established, and afford the basis from whence we might move forward in the name of Christ if men, 'full of the Holy Ghost and of

faith,' were forthcoming in larger numbers. For this we offer our prayers to God, and make our appeal to you. Under no stress of necessity will we seek to tempt men into the Ministry by unworthy inducements. We cannot abate the requirements of the Lord, the Head of the Church—requirements which it was given to our fathers to restate and emphasize in days when they had been almost forgotten. Neither can we undertake to produce the men that are needed by any exercise of influence or authority. They must be at once God's gift to the Church, and the Church's offering to God. Do not cease, then, to 'pray the Lord of the Harvest, that He will send forth labourers into His harvest.'

And prepare the way, as far as lies in your power, for your prayers being answered. Teach your children to regard the work of the Minister of the Gospel in its true light, to think of it highly, as they ought to think; and if it should please God to draw the hearts of your sons towards His service, respect their convictions and encourage their aspirations. Do not grudge your choicest and best for the work of the Lord; but count it all joy when 'the Master calleth' for son or brother, however dear to you, that He may make him His minister in this or other lands. Refusal here would be disloyalty to Christ, for which no general professions of allegiance could atone.

We have been much occupied during the past year in considering ways and means for increasing our work amongst the spiritually destitute in London. The progress of our regular Circuit work in the metropolis has been of late years most encouraging; but it is obvious that there are great populations lying around us whom our ordinary modes of working fail to reach. The irreligion of London, with its accompanying vices and miseries, deeply affects us. Its 'bitter cry' goes to our very heart. We cannot shut our eyes to the fact that this great centre of national, imperial world-life is the prize, the citadel, for which the powers of light and darkness must contend. Here lies, perhaps, the greatest issue by which the moral and religious future of mankind will be determined. We can use no language strong enough to express our sense of the responsibility of English Christians in respect of the great city, its sins and sorrows. That we should do everything in our power to carry the Gospel to its swarming masses, and bring the gracious power of Christianity to bear upon its complicated

evils, does something more than touch our honour as a Church, and our standing amongst our fellow-Christians : it concerns our very right to call ourselves the followers of the Lord Jesus Christ. We have not to 'ascend into heaven,' or to 'descend into the deep' to find our commission, and the sphere in which to fulfil it. It is, indeed, 'nigh' us. The earth does not contain fields whiter unto harvest than our own great city. No more imperious call summons us to holy labour than that which we may hear in our own streets, and from the innumerable dwellings of our own people. During our Session we have made arrangements for the beginning at least of a new effort to reach those towards whom our heart is yearning. Our plans are humble ; the scale of our attempt is small ; but the matter will not—must not—rest here. We bespeak your prayers for the brethren whom we have appointed to special mission-work in London, and for their helpers and companions. We ask for such help as you may be able to render in a work that has many sides, and can find a place for every kind of gift and qualification that Christian people possess. And from the Lord, in Whom our trust is, we ask that blessing without which, first and last, we are persuaded that our labour will be in vain.

Finally, brethren, we look beyond our own borders. We greet all who 'love our Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity.' We are all 'of one.' Their work is ours, and ours is theirs. If 'they without us cannot be made perfect,' neither can we without them. Let us unite in all practicable ways with those that 'follow after righteousness.' Let Christian principles and Christian convictions have fearless expression. Let them be applied to our public affairs, and to social and moral questions of every kind. Let us endeavour to rebuke wickedness, to cut off the opportunities of the vicious and cruel, to protect the helpless, to restore the fallen, to make it easier for all to do right, and more difficult for any to do wrong.

We thank God for the strength of Christian conscience, and the movement of Christian thought among us. All things are not dark and threatening to-day. There is much to encourage us in the spirit that pervades the Church of Christ. And if they are many that are against us, greater is He that is with us : 'The Lord of Hosts is with us, the God of Jacob is our refuge.' Of Him we cannot doubt, nor of the issue of His work. 'Wherefore, beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmovable, always

abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord.'

BELOVED FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—

Your last address to us, so generous and kindly in its spirit, we highly appreciate; and we desire at once to express our gratitude for your deep and very practical interest in our welfare. The liberal increase of your Grants to us last year greatly relieved our anxieties, and encouraged us in the maintenance of our beloved work. So widespread has been the commercial depression in the country that we feared a great deficiency in our Connexional Funds this year; but God has blessed our people with a liberal spirit, and now, with the help of your generous and timely increased Grants, we hope ere long to tide over all our financial difficulties.

Although the President—the Rev. Dr. Greeves—came amongst us for the first time, he so ably conducted our business, and showed such familiarity with our affairs, that he won our affection and confidence. We were also greatly pleased to welcome once more to our Conference the Ex-President—the Rev. Thomas M'Cullagh; the Secretary of your Conference—the Rev. Dr. Young; and the Rev. John W. Greeves. We are thankful for the lively interest they have taken in the business of the Conference. It is pleasant to enlarge our acquaintance with the English brethren.

Owing to the death of the venerable Dr. William Graham Campbell, there was a vacancy in our proportion of the Legal Hundred, and we have nominated to fill it the Rev. John Henning.

You will be pleased to learn that although our losses during the year amounted to over two thousand members, so many new members were received that we are able again to report an increase. To you it may appear to be very small, but to us it

is exceedingly encouraging, in face of a decreasing population, and the extreme difficulty of reaching the masses. It will be further gratifying to you, as it is to us, that our increase is on the Districts in the South and West where our difficulties are the greatest. Whilst that is the fact we rejoice that in other parts of the country faithful work has been done, and with a large measure of spiritual success. Indeed, our encouragements are many, notwithstanding the many depressing circumstances which surround us.

Five of our beloved brethren, after a long and faithful ministry, have been permitted to become Supernumeraries, and five have died. Among the latter is Dr. Campbell, to whom we have already referred. He was widely known in England, and we believe as greatly beloved by those who knew him there as he was in Ireland. Feeling persuaded that the best way to honour his memory was to maintain the efficiency of the General Mission, we have again appointed three missionaries.

You will be gratified to hear that we have no lack of candidates for our work. We have this year accepted six young men of considerable promise, and have a goodly number on the List of Reserve.

Our Sabbath-school work and Temperance work are being maintained with increasing vigour, and never was so much care bestowed upon the young as now. We feel under enlarged obligation to do this; as there are so many things around them to seduce them from truth, sobriety, and virtue.

We are also bestowing greater attention upon General Education. The Mission and National Schools under our charge are highly reported of, and in view of the uncertainties belonging to the present National system, we are seeking yearly to establish more such primary schools. Our Colleges in Dublin and Belfast are in a most flourishing condition, and reflect very much honour on those who have charge of them.

Great improvements have of late years been made in our Trust Property, so that we never had so many beautiful and substantial Chapels, nor so many comfortable Ministers' Residences as we have to-day. And you will be gratified to learn that comparatively little debt embarrasses any of them.

Feeling that the joy of your prosperity is ours, we watch with pleasurable interest the progress of all your affairs. It is specially pleasing to us to hear that you have at length been

able to form the West Indian Mission Stations into affiliated Conferences; and the more so as we remember that not a few of the earliest missionaries to those islands were from this country. We congratulate you on the continued success of missionary labours in every part of the world, and pray that soon all the ends of the earth may see the salvation of our God.

We have nominated as the Irish member of the Delegation the Rev. Thomas A. M'Kee, D.D.; and have also appointed him and the Rev. Henry Evans, D.D., and the Rev. John Oliver Park as our Representatives to your Conference, all of whom are thoroughly acquainted with our affairs. We have also appointed a small Committee to consider 'the Relation of Baptized Children to the Church'; and we affectionately request you to make such arrangements that it may have an opportunity of conferring, during the year, with your Committee on the same subject, so as to report to our next Conference.

We sincerely wish you the guidance and favour of the Head of the Church in your annual Assembly, and the abounding joy of a great spiritual harvest.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,—

Your kind and welcome Address has give us much joy, and called forth our gratitude to God on your behalf. Sympathising with you, as we do, in all the difficulties and anxieties connected with your work, we cannot but rejoice in the signs of

encouragement and hope to which you point. We are deeply thankful to know that, amid hindrances in the way of evangelizing the masses of the people of which, happily, we in England have little experience, and despite the adverse influence of social discontent and political agitation, your faithful labours have not been 'in vain in the Lord'; that the number of your Church-members has increased, that a spirit of liberality has been manifest among your people, and that your work in all its various departments has been maintained with energy and success.

We are especially gratified to hear of the flourishing condition of your Schools and Colleges, and to note the wise and careful attention which you are bestowing upon what we believe to be indispensable to the highest welfare of a nation—the religious education of the young. We congratulate you upon the improvement which during recent years you have made in your chapels and other trust property, and that this improvement has been effected without the addition of any embarrassing debts.

We mark with much satisfaction the interest which you continue to take in the question of the 'Relation of Baptized Children to the Church.' We trust that through the labours of your own committee and of ours, a right solution of this important question may be reached; and that such practical measures may be suggested as will tend to the early and enduring attachment of our children to the faith and fellowship of the Church of Christ.

The honoured brethren, whom we welcome as your Representatives, the Rev. Thomas A. M'Kee, D.D., the Rev. Henry Evans, D.D., and the Rev. John Oliver Park, have, by their presence among us, and the excellent addresses which they have delivered, won a high place in our regard, and done much to strengthen the tie which ever binds you and your work to our hearts.

We have confirmed your nomination of the Rev. John Henning to the vacancy in the Legal Conference caused by the death of the Rev. Dr. William Graham Campbell, whose memory is precious to many among us; and we rejoice in your resolution to maintain the efficiency of your General Mission, with which he was so long and honourably connected.

We are cheered by your continued interest in our proceedings and affairs; an interest which we heartily reciprocate. You

will be gratified to hear that under a deep sense of the responsibilities with which God has entrusted us we are endeavouring to bring our influence as a Church to bear upon Parliament in aid of measures for providing improved dwellings for the poor, and for the better protection of young women and girls against the cruel snares of the vicious and profligate. The irreligion and misery prevailing in large districts of our great metropolis has stirred the hearts of our people to seek to establish such agencies as are necessary to raise and Christianize their inhabitants, and we have sanctioned a scheme which we trust, by God's blessing, will grow into a powerful instrument of rescue and salvation. We are thankful for the many signs of a healthy spiritual life among our people. 'Showers of blessing' are falling here and there, prayer and labour are finding their reward; and many who have long sown 'in tears' now 'reap in joy.' The number of members in our Societies is larger now than it has ever been, and British Methodism, as a whole, is in a sound and prosperous condition.

And now, dear brethren, we commend you and your work to the gracious care and blessing of our faithful Lord; and our 'heart's desire and prayer to God for you is,' that whatever changes may occur and whatever may arise to impede the progress of evangelical religion, you may still be enabled with prayerful patience and courage to fulfil the ministry which you have 'received of the Lord Jesus,' and spread throughout your beloved land the experience of all the blessings of the Gospel of peace.

BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1885.

BELoved FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—

We have met this year in the extreme north of France, within sight of the white cliffs of England, in the ancient town of Calais, now become a thriving centre. In this place we are the only Protestant denomination, and have the only Circuit that is nearly self-supporting. The generosity of our friends, and their kind reception, have greatly helped us in our present difficulties.

We were disappointed, being so near England, not to see one of the Secretaries of the Missionary Society in our midst; and our regret was all the greater because of the severe family affliction that has kept away our honoured friend, the Rev. George W. Olver, B.A.

It has been a pleasure to us to see our old and warm friend, the Rev. W. Gibson, B.A., and to have his advice in specially difficult circumstances. A careful review of the spiritual state of our Church has brought before us many cheering facts. In Switzerland we have witnessed wonderful conversions among the victims of drunkenness; in Paris and in other parts of France, our Churches have increased in numbers and stability. But in two of our oldest circuits, we have found it needful to carefully revise the lists of members. We have in our Circuits a total decrease of 114 members.

We have been specially cheered by the deepened spiritual feeling and the warmer tone of piety that have been felt throughout our Connexion. The wave of revival that is

passing over us may not be producing such brilliant results as those of last year, but it is by no means gone by. In a fuller consecration to God's service, in a more joyful experience of His strength, we are going forward: the smallest tribe of our Israel; but a willing people in the day of the Lord.

Had it not been for help from above, we should have been crushed under the weight of our pecuniary difficulties. It may be that our financial system has been incomplete, and that we have in the past neglected the careful training of our Churches. But if we have committed any errors of judgment on that point, we are certainly mending our ways. After doing our utmost to reduce our expenses, we have decided to require from every church an average subscription of eight shillings per member. It will be a comparatively easy thing in our smaller churches, but a difficult one in our large and growing churches in the mountains of the South. We have, however the satisfaction of feeling that we are again treading on firm ground, and getting out of the bog of annual deficiencies.

The proposed Mission in Algeria seems to present itself in a workable form. Our Brother, John Wesley Lelièvre, has visited the country, and gives us a full Report on its necessities. That report is to be laid before the Missionary Committee. Two of our young Ministers have declared themselves willing to go into this new field, and our churches are quite ready to increase largely their Missionary contributions, if a definite proportion of that money can be applied to this new work. We have appointed an Executive Committee to make all needful preparation and begin the Mission as soon as the financial question has taken a definitive and satisfactory shape.

We have also taken steps to increase the sales of our Book-Room. Translations of some of our classical books on holiness are in preparation, in answer to a good demand for them in our churches; and a series of Methodist biographies will appear under the editorship of Dr. Matthew Lelièvre. We have for many years had on sale two volumes of Wesley's standard sermons; a third, which is in preparation, will complete the issue.

Our ranks have been increased this year by the ordination of three men who have made full proof of their ministry.

Our Students' Home was to have been opened in Nîmes, but the French laws on public instruction are such as to oblige

us to postpone for a time its official re-opening. In the meanwhile, we have received two students for whom provision will be made. For one of them we should be happy to have the benefit of one of your English institutions.

And now, with greater difficulties than usual, but with confidence in God and in our churches, we separate, with greetings to you our fathers and brethren.

We ask you to confirm the appointment of the Rev. J. P. Cook, B.A., as our President for the new year.

Our valued brother, the Rev. Matthew Lelièvre, D.D., is our Representative to your Conference, and will give you further details as to the state of our work.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,—

We have been glad to receive your customary greetings, and to hear of your affairs through your Address, and the eloquent words of the Rev. Dr. Matthew Lelièvre, whom we rejoice again to welcome as your Representative.

Whilst we note with regret the decrease in the number of your members, the good success which in several places has attended your labours encourages the hope that you may be able, ere long, to rejoice in large accessions to your Churches. We are especially thankful to hear of the conversion of victims

of intemperance in Switzerland, and of the progress of the good work in Paris and the other great centres of population under the direction of our special agent, the Rev. William Gibson, B.A.

The tendency of modern civilization to mass the population in large towns throws a great burden upon Christian Churches. It is everywhere difficult to keep pace with the rapid growth of such centres of population, and, before we are aware of it, multitudes have come together in masses from which religious influences are shut out. We feel it to be our duty to adjust our machinery to meet the needs of these populations, and are earnestly endeavouring to organize new efforts for aggressive work among them. The same duty belongs, more or less, to us and to you.

It is cause of rejoicing to hear that the work of grace in the hearts of your people is deepening. Holiness is power. The best answer we can give to the prevailing scepticism of the day is the answer of a holy and spiritual life. No success is real which does not issue in 'the spread of Scriptural holiness.' The influence of *one* wholly sanctified life is immeasurable, and if we can lead our Societies, as a whole, to the earnest pursuit of entire holiness, nothing will stand before us.

We deeply sympathize with you in your financial difficulties. You know that the demands made by our wide-spread Foreign Missions upon our resources in this country are continually increasing. New fields of labour are opening to us, and on every hand we hear the cry: 'Come over and help us!' We do not, however, intend to desert our old fields of labour, and we hope during the year to devise means for lessening in some degree your difficulties. At the same time we earnestly urge upon you to make strenuous efforts to develop your local resources. Long established churches ought to be self-supporting, and in this way the Missionary funds of our Society should be liberated for new enterprises in the regions beyond.

The proposed Mission to Algeria excites our warm interest. The aggressive spirit is essential to the prosperity of a Church, and we hope that this Missionary effort will conduce to the growth of your home churches.

We congratulate you upon the progress you are making in relation to the work of your Book-Room, and especially upon the promised completion of your translation of Wesley's

Sermons. Pernicious literature is one of the most pestilent influences of the day, and it is the duty of the Church to do its utmost to counteract it by the dissemination of pure literature in a cheap and attractive form. In this matter we are sure that no literature can do better service than that which is distinctively our own.

We sympathize with you in your conflict with superstition and rationalism. You are not alone in having to contend with tendencies to unbelief, they are to be found everywhere in this age of change. If we are faithful to our trust, we have nothing to fear from these modern assaults on 'the faith once delivered to the saints.' We trust that French Methodism may be used of God to revive that Protestantism which two centuries ago was crushed by cruel persecution. French Christianity has had its noble confessors, and shall yet, we trust, revive in forms more adapted to modern conditions and circumstances than the Reformed communities of the seventeenth century.

We are sorry that you find it impracticable as yet to open your Students' Home, but we hope that before long your way may be cleared in this matter. Your request that one of the candidates for your ministry may be received into our Theological Institution shall receive consideration.

We have acceded to your request, and have appointed the Rev. J. P. Cook, B.A., your President for the new year.

Trusting that, in all your labours and counsels, in your anxieties and not infrequent privations, you may be sustained and inspired by the Spirit of the Lord our God, and that you may witness the blessed advance of the Kingdom of Christ in the great nation among whom Methodism has been so precious a leaven of truth and grace, we shall continue, dear brethren, to cherish our union and fellowship with you in Christ Jesus.

OF THE
CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN-METHODIST
CHURCH OF SOUTH AFRICA, 1885,
TO THE
BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1885.

BELOVED FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—

Again assembled in our Annual Conference, we hasten to perform the pleasurable duty of addressing you, and of thanking you most heartily for the affectionate and sympathising reply which you have sent to our Address of last year. We feel that the bond between us is a real one, and we shall ever prize the occasion which enables us to testify to you our feelings of affectionate esteem and gratitude.

The year through which we have passed has been one of gloom and sadness so far as the commercial aspect of the country and the financial affairs of our Church are concerned. The depression over which we lamented in our Address of last year has continued and indeed increased. Drought, failure of crops, and commercial inactivity have led to an almost unprecedented result in the condition of our country. Our Colonial Churches have been struggling with financial difficulties which, in more prosperous times, they would have found it easy to overcome; our native people have suffered severely, in many instances reaching the verge of starvation; and actual famine has been felt in several districts. As a consequence, we have had to mourn over the arrest of some of those enterprises both of Missionary labour and Colonial Church extension which we hoped to have entered upon ere now. Yet in the midst of the seasons of gloom and sorrow through which our Churches have been passing, we have been cheered by their faithful adherence to the truth, and their firm reliance upon the promises of God. Temporal reverses have in many instances proved the occasion

of spiritual profit; the instability of earthly good has induced some to desire a more enduring inheritance; and disquiet and unrest have been so overruled by the Spirit of Grace as to lead many to seek the better gift of a peace which passeth all understanding, and which the world cannot give. The quickening which our Churches have experienced during the year has been of such a gratifying and remarkable character as to lead us to perceive that our financial perplexities have been blessed to the spiritual prosperity of many of our people, and that they have sought to profit by the trials through which they have been called to pass.

It is with gratitude to God that this year we report the largest increase in our English members ever yet recorded in our history, the number of new members received during the year having been 3,198, so that, after filling up vacancies occasioned by death and removal, we have a net increase of 823; and of these 531 are English. The increase in our Native Societies has not, we regret to say, kept pace with this rate of progress. The scarcity of food, the necessary migration of the people, and the political and social disturbances which so much affect our labour amongst them, have made it difficult for us to prosecute our work with that success to which, by the blessing of God, we have become accustomed. Nevertheless, after accounting for more than 1,000 Native members thus removed from our Societies, as well as for those taken from us by death, we are enabled to report an increase of 292 Native members, with a total of 8,836, English and Native, on trial. It will be gratifying to you to know that though we have been called upon to relinquish some spheres of labour, which, through various circumstances we were unable to continue, yet new openings for the proclamation of the truth and the advancement of the Kingdom of Christ are being presented to us on every side. Into some of these we have felt it to be our present and imperative duty to enter. Natives and Europeans alike, longing for the Gospel and for the Divinely-appointed means of grace, must not be denied.

The prayer of a heathen chief, repeated for a quarter of a century, and emphasized with his dying breath, that a missionary should be sent to his tribe, we have found it impossible to refuse. The voice of our own people, who in the Providence

of God have been removed from the older centres of Methodist life and worship, and are scattered abroad in newly-peopled districts, where no provision for public worship, or for the accustomed social means of grace exists, must be heard and responded to. As sheep having no shepherd, they demand our pastoral care, if we would preserve to the Church of Christ the rising generation, descendants of an enterprising and successful race of men for whom our fathers laboured, and amongst whom some of their richest triumphs were won. We have at this Conference ordained to the full work of the Ministry eight European and ten Native brethren, who have satisfied us as to their fitness for our work, and who give promise of future usefulness.

Three European young men have been received on trial after passing examinations no less searching than those which are required among yourselves. We devoutly pray that as one of the results which the great Head of the Church may be pleased to grant to our labours in these lands, there may be found a true succession of faithful men, called by the Divine voice and qualified by the gifts of the Holy Ghost to preach the Word of God, and fulfil the duties of the Christian Ministry.

We are hopefully striving to place our Connexional finances upon a secure foundation; and though the times are unfavourable and the work is novel to most of us, we are not without hope that the God of our fathers will guide our counsels and bring our plans to a successful issue.

In the midst of our efforts we are cheered and strengthened by the repeated assurance of your paternal interest in our work and welfare, and assure you that among all the sons of Methodism there are none who will cherish more ardently those feelings of affection and confidence which the traditions of the past and the experience of the present are calculated to inspire.

Your approval of our nomination of the Reverend Richard Ridgill as President of our Conference for this year, has greatly gratified us. He is amongst us 'a man greatly beloved'; and has presided over our deliberations with such wisdom, dignity and efficiency, as to render the sessions of our Conference delightful as well as profitable.

We have nominated as our President for the next year the Reverend Frederick Mason, Chairman of the Natal District, where for many years he has exercised a most powerful and

beneficial influence both upon the European and native population, and who, we believe, will discharge with fidelity and wisdom the important functions of the office. We trust you will be pleased to approve of our nomination.

We commend to you two honoured brethren, the Reverend Theophilus Chubb, B.A., and the Reverend Arthur P. Chaplin, who have laboured most successfully in our work amongst the heathen, and whom we have appointed our Representatives to your Conference. They will bear to you the assurances of our devoted attachment, and are fully competent to inform you of our affairs. We rejoice to learn that your work at home is still being blessed by the Head of the Church with tokens of His continued approval, and that so many have been added to your Societies during the year.

We cease not to pray for your prosperity, and trust that your numbers may be still more largely multiplied.

We shall return to our various spheres of labour with mingled feelings, yet those which prevail are full of gratitude and hope. We are encouraged not only by the evident blessing of God upon our work, but also by the confident expectation that we shall still have a place in your affection, and a continued interest in your sympathy and prayers.

SOUTH AFRICA OF 1885.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,—

We have read with deep interest your Address from Durban, dated April 21st, 1885, and have also received from your Representative, the Rev. Theophilus Chubb, B.A. (whom, with his colleague, the Rev. Arthur P. Chaplin, we have heartily welcomed), a verbal report of the state of your affairs.

Be assured of our unabated sympathy and earnest desire for your growth and prosperity. We recognise the greatness of the difficulties with which you have to contend, especially the long-continued and painful commercial and agricultural depression. In the working of His providence God brings good out of apparent ill; and we rejoice to hear that your prolonged trial has not proved an unmixed evil, but has perceptibly quickened your spiritual life, and is preparing you for bold and sustained aggression.

We congratulate you on the increase in the number of your Church-members, both Colonial and Native: the former, especially, calls for gratitude to God. Your action in setting apart a District Missionary for special evangelistic work has been fully justified by its results; and we trust that further similar results will be secured in connection with this agency.

The success of your Military Chaplain in the work to which you wisely appointed him is also noted by us with much satisfaction.

We are pleased to know that the importance of educational work is so practically recognised by you; and we rejoice in the results attained by your native training institutions and your High Schools for colonial boys and girls. The immediate gain to your Churches must be great, and you will reap yet further benefit as the years roll by. Successive generations will thank God for your efforts on their behalf.

We trust that increased success may attend your labours among the native populations, and that your entrance on fresh fields of labour, in response to such touching appeals as those recently addressed to you, may lead to large accessions to the cause of God. We trust you will still prosecute vigorously your Missionary operations, and urge on your people a generous support of your General Missionary Society.

As your future success must depend largely on the efficiency of those whom you admit into the Ministry, we are anxious that you should maintain the standard of excellence on which you now insist. We are glad to hear that candidates who reach that standard are forthcoming among you. May the Divine Spirit continue to call and qualify labourers for the great work in which you are engaged:

‘So shall the bright succession run
Through the last courses of the sun;
While unborn churches by their care
Shall rise and flourish large and fair.’

In connection with this subject, we would express our peculiar gratification at the ordination of eighteen brethren to the Ministry of which your Address speaks. The fact that these Colonial and Native brethren were ordained side by side, and in the presence of a mixed congregation, is significant; and in it we heartily rejoice.

The large number of members on trial which you this year report is highly gratifying. It proves that the Divine blessing is richly resting upon your labours, and affords good ground for hope.

In your efforts to place your Connexional finances upon a firm basis, we trust you will have Divine guidance and help. Plan for the future. The importance of making a good begin-

ning in this matter, and of adopting lines on which you will be able to act when your numbers and resources are largely increased, can hardly be exaggerated. The most patient care and attention, therefore, which you can bestow on this subject at the outset will be abundantly repaid.

We heartily approve of your nomination of the Rev. Frederick Mason as the next President of your Conference. Mr. Mason enjoys our confidence; and many in this country cherish happy memories of his earlier ministerial life.

The arrangement by which the services of our beloved brother, the Rev. John Walton, M.A., were secured to you for another year was, in our judgment, a very happy one; and we rejoice that, under God, his residence among you has been so signally blessed.

As to our work at home, you will be pleased to know that we enjoy unbroken peace, and a fair measure of prosperity. This year the net increase in our Societies, amounting to 2,797, while not so large as we have sometimes been able to report, nevertheless affords ground for gratitude to the Great Head of the Church. Let us all gird ourselves afresh to our work, and in our respective spheres labour patiently and constantly, that our beloved Methodism may be faithful to the traditions and memories of the past; to the light and opportunities of the present; and, so far as we can secure it, to the necessities and claims of the future.

OF THE
GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN-
METHODIST CHURCH OF THE WEST INDIES
OF 1885,
TO THE
BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1885.

BELOVED FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—

It is among the most pleasant of our duties connected with our first General Conference to send you this our message of respectful and affectionate greetings, desiring prayerfully for you grace, mercy and peace from God our Father, and the Lord Jesus Christ our common Saviour and Redeemer.

We recognise with devout thankfulness the good hand of God which has been upon the Churches of these lands from the beginning until now; and notwithstanding imperfections and failures among ourselves, and some opposition from those without, an abundant measure of Divinely-prospering blessing has rested upon us, and in the review we gratefully adopt the language of the Psalmist: 'The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad.'

It would be matter of deep heart-searchings and inquiries if, after a century of the most faithful, heroic and devoted labours of some of the best men sent forth by the Parent Society, aided by some raised up in the Churches themselves, we were in no way conditioned to take upon ourselves in the main the duties of self-support, and its correlative right and duty of self-government. We are thankful that in the judgment of the Parent Society, which has fostered us so lovingly and liberally these many years, the time has arrived when we should no

longer continue as a part of the Mission-field of the Society, but take our place among the Conferences affiliated to the yearly Conference in loving and loyal bonds. We accept the position assigned us not without a deep sense of the responsibility which it involves, but at the same time with the confidence begotten of faith in the Providence that has hitherto watched over and guided us, and the Headship of the Church that has governed us, that with new duties will come new wisdom and power, and with new necessities new sources and supplies.

The general depression of trade, together with the serious struggle to keep in existence our sugar cultivation, on which the majority of the people in many of these islands and in Demerara depend for their living, make the present time an unfavourable one for assuming new financial obligations, such as our Confidential position necessarily involves; and if we look only at this fact we might be greatly concerned; but we bear in mind that in the history of our Methodism some of the most successful enterprises were launched under similar apparent disadvantages, and our own history forbids us to doubt that if we go forth into even a wilderness guided by the cloudy pillar, Divine mercy will cover the fields with manna, and Divine power will cause waters to gush from the flinty rocks. Your past liberality, beloved fathers and brethren, and our faith in the sympathies and Christian principles of our Churches, as well as our reliance on the God of all power and grace, make us hopeful even in circumstances which seem most unfavourable to our success. Turning to indications of a favouring character, we would first name, with thankfulness to Divine Providence and you, the appointment which has been made us in our first President—the Rev. George Sargeant. His general ability, pulpit and platform efficiency, knowledge of Methodist law and usage, acquaintanceship with nearly all the Churches and ministers of our Conferences; appreciation of the good wrought in these lands by your agencies, intelligent confidence in their ability to discharge their new obligations, and hopefulness as to their future, mark him out as the most fitting man for the post he fills at our start on these new lines of self-government and control; and no one could have been more acceptable to us. We recognise a helpful Providence in his appointment, and glorify God in him.

Looking at the Churches, we have abundant reason to be

thankful. They not only maintain their vitality, but are growing in vigour; not only do they keep their piety, but are increasing in power. Like Churches in some favoured lands, they have their features of discouragement and apparent defeat from the assaults of the powers of darkness; but we thankfully record that as of old, so now, the God of our Fathers is with us, 'confirming the word with signs following.' We are not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ, nor of the specimens which our Churches furnish of those who are saved by its power. The exodus of our labouring people by thousands to the Isthmus of Panama has affected our membership very seriously; but we are glad to find that notwithstanding this large draft we show an increase of 182, and a total numerical strength in the Conference of 43,317 full and accredited members, 1,807 on trial, and 2,876 members in Junior Classes.

You will be as thankful to know, as we are pleased to mention, that peace and harmony prevail throughout our churches, and that our new arrangement has been hailed as a wise and just measure; that in many cases where doubt existed as to its desirability or discreetness, now that it has come into operation there is a feeling that longer delay would have retarded the development of these churches in many piety and efficient action on the populations around. Outside our own ecclesiastical circle there is great sympathy with our present position, and we have had friendly greetings by appointed deputations to our Pastoral Sessions of the Annual Conferences and the general Conference, from our Baptist, Presbyterian and Moravian brethren. These visits and words of cheer have been very acceptable.

Among the things which have engaged our attention, as having a vital bearing on our future, is our Educational work. Our primary education is matter to us of very great concern, not only because of its intrinsic importance, but on account of the financial difficulties under which we have to prosecute it. Our Colonial Governments are financially unable to meet to the full the claims of our rising generations for educational provisions, and we have no resources beyond the grant afforded us by the Parent Society. We dare not close a single school, and shut up the children of a district in which we labour to the darkness of intellectual night, with all its deplorable consequences. We move on, though we have little light, trusting in Lord, and staying ourselves upon our God.

Our higher educational efforts in the Western Conference afford us matter for grateful praise. The York Castle School, for boys, and the Barbican School, for girls, command the highest respect, and share the fullest confidence of the public. In public examinations, in connection with the Syndicate of Cambridge University and the London University, our candidates come out second to none from the other schools, and superior to most.

We are thankful for the sympathy and support which these Schools have received from the Missionary Committee, and we hope, through the liberality of the financial arrangements, for our Conference to have, at an early date, a School similar to York Castle in the city of St. John's, Antigua, in the Eastern Conference.

The Theological department of the York Castle Institution is fulfilling its mission in the training of our accepted candidates; and at the present time there are ten young men in Circuit work in different parts of the West Indies sent from the institution, and concerning whom we have every satisfaction in their present labours, and every hope that they will gain for themselves a good degree. No more thoughtful regard could have been shown for our efficiency than the encouragement given this institution by the committee in the past years of its existence, and the financial help promised for the next term of seven years.

True to the family instincts, the subject of Missions has engaged our prayerful consideration. We are concerned to push our work earnestly throughout the islands. Hayti, where we have for over a quarter of a century carried on our Mission work, claims a more vigorous handling, if we are to make any impression on the Popish and almost Pagan population of that large and deeply necessitous country.

Our resources are not equal to the demands. We will do all that lies in our power, for we cannot be at ease when men are perishing before our eyes for lack of knowledge; and we entreat, through your Conference, the Christian people of England, and especially the Methodist people, to succour us in our efforts to Christianize and convert Hayti and Santo Domingo to a belief and practice of 'the truth as it is in Jesus.'

At Panama, to which thousands of the people of these lands have gone, including many of our own Churches, we have com-

menced a Mission, and never was work more necessary. It strains our finances to sustain it, but we cannot abandon it. We must rather extend it. Nor Hayti, nor Santo Domingo, nor Panama alone, Porto Rico, Gaudaloupe, Martinique and Cuba, are waiting for the law and the Gospel of peace, and we want to claim them for Christ. We ask your sympathies and prayers that we might not be straitened, but enlarged; so that the desires of our hearts might be satisfied in seeing these naturally fertile islands, but moral and spiritual deserts, like unto fields which the Lord our God has blessed.

The year 1886 will be the centenary year of Methodism in these islands, and we have arranged suitably to celebrate it. We are hoping by this movement not only to give an impetus to the piety and zeal of our Churches, but to create a Centenary Fund, which shall enable us to do especially our Mission work. In connection with this movement we have arranged to publish a Memorial Volume, with a short sketch of our history, but chiefly with short biographies of a number of our ministers and members whose lives and labours are among our richest inheritance. We hope by this means to hand down to succeeding generations the memory of our pious dead, whose devoted lives and triumphant deaths furnish illustrations of our successes, and unanswered and unanswerable arguments for the Divine character of our holy Christianity.

We have appointed two esteemed brethren, David Wright, of the Eastern, and Arthur Bourne, of the Western Conference; brethren who have permission to return to England, and whom we hope to welcome back to our Conference, to convey to you our affectionate and hearty greetings, and to assure you that nothing will be wanting on our part, either in fidelity to the great principles which our Fathers have unflinchingly held, or in self-denying labours, of which they set us such noble examples, to make the Conferences in point of efficiency and success that which we naturally desire and devoutly hope to realize.

We have agreed to recommend as our President for another term of three years the Reverend George Sargeant, the present occupant of the Chair, and we respectfully ask the yearly Conference to accede to this request.

In conclusion, we commend you, in your Conference assembled, to the God of all grace and wisdom.

May the blessings of the Covenant be richly yours ; and may you and the Churches to which you minister be abundantly baptized from on High.

APPENDIX III.

REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY COMMITTEE
ON THE LENGTH OF SERVICE AND
FURLOUGHS OF MISSIONARIES.

IN considering the questions referred to it by the Conference of 1884, the Committee thought it advisable first of all to ascertain as nearly as possible what service has been and is usually rendered by Ministers sent out from this country at the expense of the Society.

The statistics gathered had reference to all Ministers, and to those only, who, being in connection with the British Conference at the time of its meeting in 1884, were then or at some time had been employed as agents of the Society in Foreign Service.

The following facts were ascertained, viz. :—

1. At the time of the Conference of 1884, the number of Ministers then in connection with the Conference who were or had been engaged in Foreign Service was 442.

2. Of these, 14 were abroad, but had not as yet served one year; whilst 428 had served one year or upwards.

3. Of the 442 at the time of the Conference in 1884, there were—

It must be noted, however, that as the same Minister may have rendered service at different times in two or more Mission-fields, and will therefore be counted in as many fields, so the total number of Ministers in this table will apparently differ from that given in paragraphs 3 and 4.

To assist in the consideration of the questions referred, the Committee caused inquiries to be made of the other principal Missionary Societies; but it was found that they were unable to give the information needed as to terms of service, except

at an expenditure of time and labour which could not be reasonably requested. Moreover, it was apparent that as to such matters as those now in question, the Wesleyan Missionary Society stands alone.

Other Missionary Societies are under the management of independent Committees. The Missionaries employed are selected and engaged by the Committees, and are entirely subject to their control. With the Wesleyan Missionary Society it is otherwise. The Missionaries whom it sends out are selected by the Yearly Conference, and they are subject to its control, and are liable to be appointed by it from year to year. Out of this liability they have no power to contract themselves so long as they remain in connection with the Conference. Nor does it appear that the Yearly Conference itself can do more than appoint from year to year.

The particular Ministers who serve in Mission-fields are no more under any obligation to do this part of the work than are those who remain at home, and on their return they have the same claim to a place in the Ministry at home as those who have never left their native land.

The Committee is aware that in the early years of the Society definite terms of service were fixed for the several Mission-fields. Although the regulations bearing thereupon have not been enforced, it does not appear that they have ever been rescinded.

The Committee recognises the great importance of securing prolonged service to the utmost extent that is reasonably possible. The cost of outfit and passage is by no means the most important consideration. The rapid development of Mission-work in every part of the world calls for the guiding power of men of experience, intimately acquainted with the language and habits of the people among whom they labour. The service rendered must of necessity be willingly given. No other labour would be of much value. The appeal must still lie to the spirit of loyalty to Christ, and devotion to the interests of His kingdom.

APPENDIX IV.

REVISED RULES AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

WESLEYAN-METHODIST MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

THE following were adopted by the Conference of 1884 :—

I. This Institution shall be designated THE WESLEYAN-METHODIST MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

II. The object of this Society is to combine the exertions of the societies and congregations of the Wesleyan-Methodists in the support and extension of the Foreign Missions which were first established by the Rev. John Wesley, M.A., the Rev. Thomas Coke, LL.D., and others ; and which are now, or shall be, from year to year, carried on under the direction or with the sanction of the Yearly Conference of the people called Methodists.

III. All Benefactors of Ten Pounds and upwards, and all Annual Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards to the Society, directly or through any of its Auxiliaries or Branches, shall be, in right of such benefaction or subscription, members of the Society, and shall be entitled as such to a copy of the Annual Report, as well as to a copy of the Report (if there be one) of the District Auxiliary or Local Branch, and a copy of each number of the *Missionary Notices*.

IV. All persons who collect to the amount of one shilling or upwards weekly, or of five shillings or upwards monthly, for the Society or for any of its Auxiliaries or Branches, shall also be members of the Society, and, as such, entitled to a copy of the Annual Report, and the Report of any Auxiliary or Branch with which such collectors may be connected, and of the *Missionary Notices*.

V. A Committee shall be annually appointed by the Conference, in accordance with such regulations for its constitution as from time to time may be in force. To this Committee shall be entrusted the superintendence of the collection and disbursement of all moneys raised for the purposes of the Society, and also the general management of the Missions, subject to the general rules and usages of the Connexion.

Meetings of this Committee shall be held in London once a month or oftener for the transaction of business.

VI. Two Treasurers, one of whom shall be a minister and one a layman, shall be annually appointed by the Conference in accordance with such Connexional rules as from time to time may be in force.

VII. The General Secretaries of the Society shall be annually appointed by the Conference in accordance with any regulations which from time to time may be in force touching such appointments.

VIII. The Committee shall at its first meeting after the Conference appoint a Finance and General Purposes Sub-Committee, whose duty it shall be to meet weekly to consider and report upon any matters, financial or otherwise, which may be submitted to it, and generally to prepare business for the Committee.

IX. The accounts of the Society shall be annually audited by a professional Auditor, who shall be appointed annually by the Committee.

X. As the Missionaries who are sent out from this country to labour under the direction of this Society are to be ministers in connection with the Yearly Conference, and have generally a claim to be recognised as such on their return from Foreign Stations, the selection of candidates for the Mission Work shall be made in accordance with any regulations which may be in force from time to time for the selection of Candidates for the Home Work.

XI. If in the interval between the Annual Meetings of the Conference the list of accepted Candidates shall be exhausted, and more are urgently wanted, or if a Missionary with special qualifications shall be immediately required, the Committee shall be at liberty to employ other suitable persons; provided always that such persons shall have been previously recommended by their respective Superintendents, and by the Quarterly Meetings of the Circuits to which they belong, and either by the District Meetings or by three neighbouring Superintendents, and shall also have been examined and approved by a Special Committee, constituted as hereinafter described. But this liberty shall be used by the Committee only in cases of pressing emergency, and then only with the expressed consent of the President of the Conference for the time being.

XII. The trial of any Missionary who may at any time be accused of misconduct or of any departure from the doctrines and discipline of the Connexion, shall in all ordinary cases be left with the District Meeting to which he may belong, according to the general rules and usages of the Methodist Conference. But the Conference may at any time recall any Missionary for any reason which it may deem sufficient; and in the intervals between the Annual Meetings of the Conference, the Committee in London shall possess and may exercise a similar power of recall, and of putting any Missionary so recalled upon his trial, either at the ensuing Conference, or, in a case requiring immediate decision, before a Special Committee, constituted as hereinafter described.

XIII. The Special Committee, to which reference is made in the two foregoing regulations, shall consist of the Ministerial Officers and Members of the Missionary Committee, together with three Ministers from each London District, who shall be annually appointed by the Conference. The President of the Conference for the time being, or in his absence an ex-President, shall preside at the Meetings of this Committee.

XIV. An Annual Public Meeting of the members and friends of this Society shall be held in London on the Monday preceding the first Wednesday in May. In connection with this Anniversary there shall be such other religious services as may be deemed expedient.

XV. Missionary Societies for the several Districts into which the Connexion is divided, in this kingdom or elsewhere, shall be entitled Auxiliary Wesleyan-Methodist Missionary Societies for the Districts in which they have been or may be formed. The Treasurer of each District Auxiliary shall be appointed by the Financial District Meeting in September.

XVI. Missionary Societies in the several Circuits of any District shall be entitled Branch Societies for the Circuits, or, if there be more than one such Society in any Circuit they shall be entitled Branch Societies, Juvenile or otherwise, for the cities, towns, or villages in which they are or shall be established.

XVII. A Committee shall be appointed in connection with each District Auxiliary and Local Branch Society. It shall be the duty of these Committees to supervise and promote the efficiency of the Societies with which they are severally con-

nected. These Committees shall be appointed at the Annual Meetings of the respective Societies.

XVIII. The money raised in any Circuit for the purposes of the Society, in whatever way collected, shall be regularly paid by the Local Treasurer whenever he shall have five pounds in hand, and whatever the amount may be, at least once in every three months, to the Treasurer of the District Auxiliary in which the said Circuit is situated, with the deduction only of any sums that may have been incidentally expended for the purposes of the Local Branch.

XIX. The Treasurer of every District Auxiliary shall remit to the General Treasurers of the Society whenever he has twenty-five pounds in hand from any or all sources; and at least once in every quarter he shall remit the total balance of all sums received by him from the various Circuits in his District, deducting only the necessary incidental expenses incurred by the Auxiliary Society.

XX. Subject to the provisions of Regulation No. XXIII., it shall be the duty of the Local Secretaries to summon the Local Committees at least once a quarter, and to keep Minutes of their proceedings. In co-operation with the Committees they shall provide for the thorough canvass of the several congregations; they shall meet the Collectors once in every month and receive the money collected, and pay the same to the Local Treasurer; they shall secure the punctual distribution of the Reports and Monthly Notices; and they shall see that due arrangements are made for the holding of monthly Missionary Prayer Meetings, in accordance with the regulation of the Conference in 1815, and republished in 1883, and for Anniversary Services.

XXI. It shall also be the duty of the Treasurers and Secretaries of every Branch Society, or other Local Association, to forward annually to the Secretaries of the Auxiliary Society for their District an Alphabetical List of all the Benefactors and Subscribers during the preceding twelve months with an account of their respective contributions, stating at the same time what portion of the sum so received has been detained for local expenses, and what portion has been paid to the Treasurer for the District. And the Treasurer and Secretaries of every District Auxiliary Society shall also forward annually to the General Secretaries a similar List of the Benefactors and

Subscribers in all the Circuits of their District, and an abstract of the account of the Auxiliary Society, showing its gross receipts, its local payments, and its remittances to the General Treasurers.

XXII. All the Members of the Society and of the Auxiliary and Branch Societies are earnestly recommended to consider it as a part of their daily duty to ask for the blessing of the Almighty God upon the efforts of the Society, and upon those of all similar Societies, inasmuch as without His continual grace there can be neither qualified men nor successful labour.

XXIII. The foregoing Regulations shall always be interpreted in harmony with the laws and usages of the Connexion, and therefore with a full recognition of the authority and responsibility of the several District Committees, as also of Superintendents and their colleagues, upon whose sympathy and co-operation the success of the Society and of its several Auxiliaries and Branches must mainly depend.

APPENDIX V.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE RESPECTING NEW FORMS OF CONVEYANCE, AND FOR APPOINTMENT OF TRUSTEES.

THE Committee report that during the year they have secured the preparation of a revised Precedent of Conveyance of Ground for the purposes of a Wesleyan-Methodist Chapel, with Declaration of Trusts by reference to the Chapel Model Deed, so as to bring the Form into harmony with recent legislation on the subject. The Committee have also secured the preparation of revised Forms for Vesting the Trust-Property upon Appointments of new Trustees, adapted to several different events in which such new Appointments may become necessary, and they have obtained Counsel's opinion thereon. The Committee are further engaged in obtaining similar Forms adapted for use in respect of Wesleyan-Methodist Trust-Property in Scotland. The whole proceedings in relation to this business have been laid before the special Committee appointed by the last Conference to confer with and assist the Chapel Committee in the preparation of the revised Forms.

The Committee find that considerable difference of opinion exists as to the bearing of some of the provisions of the Conveyancing and Law of Property Act, 1881, upon Appointments of Trustees, and Vesting of Property held on the Trusts of our Model Deeds; and they think it desirable in view of the great importance of the subject, that a Judicial decision should be obtained as to the construction and application of at least one clause of the Act. Upon the whole question, the Committee request that the matter may be referred to them again with such additional powers as they may deem necessary, and that the special Committee to confer with and assist the Chapel Committee be re-appointed and enlarged.

APPENDIX VI

METROPOLITAN CHAPEL BUILDING FUND.

I.—REPORT.

THE Committee present the following Summary:—

1. Chapel opened, Sutton. Chapels in progress, Fernhead Road, in the Sutherland Gardens Circuit; and Hornsey, in the Highgate Circuit.
2. Sites for large Chapels are held at Agincourt Road, Amhurst Park, Denmark Park, Forest Hill, Walham Green, West Green, and Catford Bridge.
3. The acquisition of new sites has been authorised at Kingston-on-Thames; at Norbiton, in the Kingston-on-Thames Circuit; at Wimbledon, in the Wandsworth Circuit; at Ilford, in the Stratford Circuit; and at Lower Road, in the Deptford Circuit. Some other sites are being arranged for. Temporary Chapels have been already erected on several of these sites.

Since October 1862, when the first of Metropolitan Chapel Building Fund Chapels was opened, the Fund has aided in the erection of sixty-six large Chapels in London, seating, when completed, not fewer than 66,000 persons. It has also aided in the purchase of twelve sites for Chapels yet to be built.

With these Chapels are connected School Rooms, Lecture Halls, Class Rooms, and other accommodation, which, when completed, will have cost above £600,000; besides a large

number of smaller Chapels that may be indirectly traced to the influence of this Fund.

Towards these Chapels the Fund has contributed, and promised, not less than £180,000.

Within these Chapels not fewer than 70,000 persons will hear the Gospel every Sunday, and upwards of 12,000 Church-members are connected with them.

Their annual pecuniary contributions to Methodism cannot be less than £85,000, and their total seat-rents for 1883-4 were £12,205.

The Metropolitan Chapel Building Fund must thus be regarded as having laid the broad and solid foundation on which alone Methodism can build its proposed new Metropolitan evangelistic work. Without it our Church in the Metropolis would have been microscopic. With it our Metropolitan advance has during the last twenty years surpassed that of our Church in any other part of the world.

The new movement, to which Sir William M'Arthur offered to give £10,000 at the rate of £2,000 per annum for five years, on condition that other Metropolitan Methodists would provide £40,000 at the rate of £8,000 a year, and with the hope that the provinces would find a similar sum, progresses slowly, about £35,000 having been promised. Nothing has yet been received from the provinces. To them the Committee continue to appeal.

II.—FINANCE.

(A) *Income*.—The income of the year has been as under:—

Altogether, with balance and with interests on deposits, etc., the Income of the Fund has been £9,935, 13s.

(B) *Expenditure*.—The Grants and Loans paid have amounted to £2,275. A very much larger amount would have been paid to claimant Chapels had the Executors of the late Sir Francis Lycett been in a position to pay over to the Committee the proportion of his gift due to the Fund.

On the Ordinary Deposit Grant's account the entire expenditure leaves a balance of £1,895 14s. 6d. in the City Bank, with about £6,000 in other investments; but the claims already

allowed and impending amount to not less than £34,000 in this one branch of the Fund. The New Special Fund is under obligations to the amount of about £12,000. The Loans outstanding amounted, at the end of the Financial year, to £25,391 5s.

APPENDIX VII.

ABSTRACT OF REPORT OF COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO WATCH THE INTERESTS OF METHODISM IN SOUTH WALES.

1. THIS Committee has met twice during the year. It has considered many questions affecting the interests of Methodism in South Wales; and it has made two special grants in matters connected with the re-adjustment of our English and Welsh work. The Committee re-affirms its recommendation for the amalgamation of Brecon (English and Welsh) Circuits. Its proceedings have been duly reported to the Bristol, Swansea, and South Wales District Committees.

2. THE SOUTH WALES AND MONMOUTHSHIRE WESLEYAN-METHODIST EXTENSION FUND.

(a) The sum of £3,121 3s. 8d. has been (so far) *locally* promised to the Fund.

(b) Rules and Regulations for its administration have been adopted, and Schedules have been prepared.

(c) Grants in aid have been *conditionally* made in thirteen Chapel cases, and in one of Lay agency.

(d) Special help to this Fund, under certain conditions, have been promised from the Chapel Committee, and from the Home Mission Committee; and it is hoped that help will also be similarly given by the Committee for the Extension of Methodism in Great Britain.

Whilst the Committee have carefully attended to the general control and administration of this Fund, many matters—some of which have required careful local investigation—have been remitted to the consideration of various Sub-Committees, who have rendered most effective help to the objects contemplated by this Fund.

APPENDIX IX.
ABSTRACT OF THE REPORT

OF

THE CHILDREN'S HOME AND ORPHANAGE.

THE year just closed has not witnessed any large extension of the work of The Children's Home and Orphanage. The condition of the finances at the commencement of the year imposed great caution upon the Committee. This limitation has been the occasion of very great distress, for applications of the most touching character are constantly arriving, many of which are necessarily refused. Besides, there is a great field of rescue work among children for whom no application is ever likely to be made. As the moral and religious bearings of the work are fully set out in the Report of the Principal, it is sufficient for the Committee to say that, having regularly received reports concerning the moral and spiritual condition of the Homes, and having exercised a careful and minute oversight of the expenditure, the Committee are able to report that the work was never in a more healthy condition, or more thoroughly deserving of the confidence and support of its friends.

The financial condition of the Home is, happily, changed very greatly for the better. At the commencement of the year the debt was reported at £9,200. In the month of June the Principal issued an appeal for special subscriptions to liquidate the debt. That appeal was most kindly responded to, and a sum of £7,000 was promised. Of this, £5,407 10s. 6d. were paid before the close of the financial year, March 31st. £1,660 remain, and will probably be paid during the course of this year. The receipt of the above sum has enabled the Committee to close the year with a debt now reduced to £3,495 17s. 6d. When the subscriptions already promised have been received, the debt will not be more than £2,000. It is earnestly hoped that other

donations may still be received, and the entire balance promptly and completely liquidated.

The subscriptions and donations show an increase of £649 in the year, the Birthday Society an increase of £170, the Sunday-School Offerings £133. It is with special satisfaction that the Committee refers to the fact that the Colonial Birthday Society has during the year produced £790,—£191 more than the year previous.

During the year, April 1st, 1884, to March 31st, 1885, 228 have been admitted, and 215 have been sent out from the Home.

In the Children's Mission about 500 are under religious teaching and influence. And correspondence, by letter or visitation, is systematically maintained with about 450 former inmates of the Home, who are not yet old enough to act with complete independence.

APPENDIX X.

ABSTRACT OF THE REPORT OF THE TEMPERANCE
COMMITTEE TO THE CONFERENCE OF 1885.

WE report this year in Great Britain 3,133 Bands of Hope, with 818,357 enrolled members, an increase during the last twelve months of 151 Bands of Hope and 13,135 members. The progress of the Band of Hope movement among us is continuous and marked. The returns with respect to Wesleyan-Methodist Temperance Societies are unsatisfactory. They number only 308 for the whole of Great Britain, with 24,450 members. There is a decrease under every head of the Temperance schedule. Much evidence has reached us that these returns would be entirely misleading if they were interpreted to mean that there are fewer adult Methodists who take an active interest in the Temperance movement. The exact opposite is the fact. But the great majority of our people are identified in the Blue Ribbon, and other undenominational societies. Multitudes of the most active workers in the British Temperance League, the National Temperance League and other organizations are Wesleyan-Methodists. At the same time, the Committee deem it of the utmost importance that our own people should be directed and guided by Ministers and Temperance Workers, in harmony with our Church discipline, and the Committee respectfully submit that the time has fully come when we must fairly face the problem of adult Temperance Societies on denominational lines.

Every year Temperance Sunday is more universally observed. Several of the Districts now issue special circulars of their own, urging the observance of that day, and also follow it up by great central gatherings, which attract attention and exert much influence. One of the Districts earnestly recommends that efforts be made to increase the circulation of *The Methodist Temperance Magazine*, which is now the property of the Connection, and the official organ of your Committee.

APPENDIX XI.

RESOLUTIONS ON PASTORAL WORK.

THESE RESOLUTIONS, INCLUDING THE 'LIVERPOOL MINUTES,' ARE COLLECTED AND CODIFIED, BY DIRECTION OF THE CONFERENCE, FROM THE PRINTED MINUTES 1811—1878, BY THE REV. JOSEPH BUSH; AND ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE, 1885.

OURSELVES AND OUR FAMILIES.

WE, on this solemn occasion, devote ourselves afresh to God; and resolve, in humble dependence on His grace, to be more than ever attentive to personal religion, and to the Christian instruction and government of our families. And we further resolve to cultivate more fully the spirit of Christian

Pastors, so that all our intercourse with our people may be to edification; and as 'overseers of the flock,' to give ourselves to the work of 'warning every man, and teaching every man in all wisdom, that we may present every man perfect in Christ Jesus.' And in order to this, let us frequently read and carefully study Mr. Wesley's 'Twelve Rules of a Helper,' and other parts of the Large Minutes which relate to the duties of a Preacher and Pastor.

Let us daily consecrate ourselves entirely to our proper work as the servants of Christ and of His Church, giving ourselves 'wholly' to it, both in public and private. Let us strictly guard against all occupations of our time and thoughts which have no direct relation to our great calling, and which would injuriously divert our attention from the momentous task of saving 'them that hear' us, and taking 'care of the Church of God.'

Let us afresh, solemnly and heartily, recognise the original purpose of Methodism 'to spread Scriptural holiness through the land,' and ever regard this as the first and great calling of the Methodist people, and especially of the Preachers. And let us determine, in the Name of God, that this idea shall rule our whole life, and that every pursuit and design shall be subordinated to this our high and special calling.

THE STUDY.

Let us humbly and earnestly seek a more complete preparation for the great work of the Ministry, and especially that richer 'unction of the Holy One' which is vouchsafed only to men who live near to God. This anointing for our office would yield what most of all we ourselves need and desire: a large increase of ardent piety and of vigorous faith; holy importunity in prayer, and irresistible persuasiveness in preaching.

Let us 'covet earnestly the best gifts,' to qualify us for an effective and useful ministry; and let us seek them in fervent prayer to Him Who is the Father of lights, and the Fountain of wisdom. Let us meanwhile 'stir up the gift of God which is in' us, and improve our talents by close study and diligent cultivation; and especially let every one of us 'study to show' himself 'approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth.' Let us take care that whatever other qualifications we may acquire

and use, our ministry shall at least be always marked by sound evangelical doctrine, by plainness of speech, and by a spirit of tender affection and burning zeal.

THE PULPIT.

Let us preach constantly the leading and vital doctrines of the Gospel: repentance toward God; a present, free and full salvation from sin; a salvation flowing from the grace of God alone, 'through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus,' and apprehended by the simple exercise of faith; a salvation which begins with the forgiveness of sins; this forgiveness being certified to the penitent believer by the Holy Spirit; and by the Power of that Divine Spirit who bears the witness, a change of heart; a salvation which is the only entrance to a course of practical holiness.

And let us preach these cardinal doctrines in our primitive method,—evangelically and experimentally, with apostolical earnestness, zeal and simplicity. Let us 'labour in the word and doctrine'; applying our discourses closely and lovingly to the various classes of our hearers, and 'by manifestation of the truth, commending ourselves to every man's conscience in the sight of God.'

Remembering that the prominence which is properly given in the Methodist pulpit to the doctrine of present salvation is ever liable to Antinomian abuses, let us diligently and evangelically preach the precepts as well as the privileges of the Gospel, expounding them carefully, and applying them faithfully.

Let us build up our people in knowledge and holiness; urging them to fidelity in family duties, and especially in the godly training up of their children; and in general to 'follow after the things which make for peace, and things wherewith one may edify another.'

In every place let us speak plainly and pointedly on the duty and advantage of Christian fellowship, and exhort all who are seeking salvation to avail themselves, without delay, of the help of our more private means of grace.

In particular, let us urge upon all our people a conscientious and frequent observance of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper; expounding its nature; instructing the young and reasoning with the timid and the doubting; and setting forth

the duty and blessedness of showing 'the Lord's death till He come.'

SOCIETY MEETINGS.

Being fully persuaded that the regular and frequent meeting of our Societies is of vital importance to the prosperity and perpetuation of the work of God amongst our people, let us meet the principal Societies regularly on the Lord's Day, and frequently on the week evenings in country places. And let us make such Meetings interesting and profitable to our Members by information as to the State of the Work of God in the Circuit generally; by reference to the special circumstances of the Society then present; and by explaining our own Rules, and putting the brethren 'in remembrance' of their specific duties, both personal and domestic.

And from time to time let us exhort our Members, in the event of their removing into other Circuits, to secure a Note of Removal, and to seek immediate connection with the Society in the place whither they go to reside.

And inasmuch as religion in our Societies depends largely upon the cultivation amongst us of family religion, let us earnestly press upon our people the regular and devout observance of family worship, accompanied by the reading of Holy Scripture. And in order to a due discharge of this most important domestic duty, a suitable and sufficient portion of time should be conscientiously set apart in the morning and evening of each day, when the attendance of all the members of the household, servants included, should be arranged for and required.

Let us also at such Meetings earnestly exhort our Societies to make the best and most religious use of the rest and leisure of the Lord's Day. Let us urge upon our Members to sanctify the Sabbath-day, not only personally but in their families, by commanding 'their children and their households to keep the way of the Lord'; and especially by a regular attendance upon the public worship of Almighty God, both morning and evening, and by arranging that, in their families, as few persons as possible are kept at home.

And let us show to our people the evil of wasting, in visits or in receiving company, those hours of the holy Sabbath which are not spent in public worship; and that such a practice tends

to the neglect of private prayer, of the study of the Scriptures, and of the religious instruction of children,—and also to the spiritual injury of domestic servants, who are thereby needlessly kept at work on the day of rest, and deprived of the public means of grace.

And, lastly, let us guard our people against the danger of expending all their time and energy on local and subordinate enterprises and works of charity, to the neglect of the public preaching of the Gospel, the weekly meeting for prayer and intercession, and the Class-meeting. Let us show them that, by a wise economy of time, they may 'fulfil their course' of benevolent activities without robbing God of the public worship which He demands. And on this question let us, as occasion serves, remind our Members that, under the Divine blessing, the prosperity of the spiritual work of God depends upon the regular and conscientious use of His institutions, for it is through the means that we reach the end; and our own history shows that, in the success of the spiritual work of God, all other good undertakings among us had their origin, and have ever had their principal support. 'These things ought ye to have done, and not to leave the other undone.'

LEADERS' MEETINGS.

Let us regularly meet the Class-Leaders, both in town and country; and at each Leaders' Meeting, let us carefully examine the entries made in the Class-Books relative to the attendance of the Members, in order that prompt and practical measures may be taken in cases which, on inquiry, shall be found to demand the exercise of discipline, 'the word of exhortation,' or kindly counsel and Christian sympathy.

From the beginning, Leaders' Meetings have been found essential to the pastoral care and spiritual prosperity of our Societies, and also to the orderly transaction of their financial concerns. Where Leaders' Meetings are frequently held, the work of the Leaders is done more perfectly. And by a minute examination of the Class-Books, in the presence of the Leaders, we learn who are the sick, the careless, or the lukewarm; and then, in making pastoral visits, we are prepared to go, 'not only to those who want us, but to those who want us most.' Let us, therefore, see to it that Leaders' Meetings are held regularly, and as often as practicable, not only in the towns

in which Ministers reside, but also in the principal country places.

As much depends, under the blessing of God, on the piety, zeal and devotion, the Scriptural knowledge and Christian temper of our Leaders, and also on their intelligent and hearty approval of the doctrines and discipline of Methodism, let us, before nominating a new Leader, satisfy ourselves, by previous inquiry and personal examination, as to the character and qualifications of the person proposed.

Whenever a new Leader, nominated by us and accepted by the Leaders' Meeting, is first introduced to the Meeting, let us take that opportunity of stating the duties which belong to the office. And in particular, let us urge upon our Leaders the vital importance of seeing or communicating with each of their Members once a week.

Let us promote in every place the observance of those parts of our discipline which refer to Watch-nights, private and public Bands, and Quarterly Fast Days.

QUARTERLY VISITATION.

Believing that, next to the public 'Ministry of the Word,' the Quarterly Visitation of the Classes is our most important official work; and remembering that to those of our Members who are not accessible for visitation at their own homes, the Visitation of the Classes is probably their only opportunity of direct intercourse with their Ministers, let us be careful each quarter to meet personally every Class, never sending the tickets to the Leader.

And in making the ticket plan, let us so arrange the Visitation as not to crowd too many Classes together; but rather, by beginning the work early in the quarter, allow sufficient time in meeting each Class for a careful examination of the Members as to their Christian knowledge, experience and practice, and for inquiry as to family religion; and also for suitable pastoral advice, encouragement or admonition, for 'consolation in Christ,' for 'comfort of love,' for 'fellowship of the Spirit.'

And in connection with the Visitation of the Classes, let us on the one hand, inquire particularly into the experience and habits of those whom we find 'on trial,' and receive into Society those only who, after due probation, may fairly be 'counted worthy.' And on the other hand, let us not, upon

slight grounds, return any person as having 'ceased to meet,' but before writing off such a one, let us inquire particularly into the case; and, wherever practicable, let us ourselves visit the person; and thus, 'by all means save some' of the many who 'forsake the assembling of themselves together.'

PASTORAL VISITATION.

We recognise the absolute obligation which is laid upon us—and which was solemnly acknowledged at the time we received ordination—to secure, by mutual consultation and arrangement, such a general, stated and efficient visitation of our people at their own dwellings as is involved in the Scriptural command to 'feed the Church of God,' and in the example of St. Paul, who 'taught' the people 'publicly, and from house to house'; and also in those other Scriptures which, in varied language, represent Christian Ministers as the under-shepherds of the flock of God,—Jesus Christ Himself being the 'Chief Shepherd.'

We are persuaded that the unity and edification of our Societies, and the good feeling of our people generally, would be promoted by increased pastoral intercourse with them at their own homes. And, in the present day, the perilous exposure of our Members to the manifold fascinations of worldliness demands unremitting diligence on our part; and especially that, in connection with our pastoral visits, there should be, whenever practicable, the reading of a suitable portion of Holy Scripture and prayer.

We do not forget that the cares and labours, both spiritual and economical, which devolve upon Ministers, and in particular upon Superintendents, are steadily increasing; but at the same time the proportion of Ministers to Members is also increasing. And we are convinced that, by a wise economy of time, by energy and perseverance, and especially by system and method, much more pastoral visitation may be accomplished.

We therefore resolve to give ourselves afresh and more fully to this part of our work; and we agree to devote regularly certain portions of our time to visiting the Members of our Societies 'from house to house.' And we will strive to make our visits profitable to the people, by kindly inquiry into their Christian experience, by giving seasonable counsel, and by

exhorting them to a faithful and loving observance of all the duties of personal and family religion.

In particular, let us care for the aged, the infirm, the sick and the poor; let us keep watch over the lukewarm and the careless; and let us pay special attention to backsliders. 'In the spirit of meekness,' and in much patience, let us endeavour to 'restore' them that have been 'overtaken in a fault'; and seek by private efforts, as well as by our public ministrations, to recover the fallen 'out of the snare of the devil.' And, lastly, when we go to our country appointments on week evenings, let us secure time, before the public service, for the pastoral visitation of village Methodists.

OVERSIGHT OF THE YOUNG.

In order that the work of God may be perpetuated among us, let us, in public and in private, pay particular spiritual attention to the young people of our Societies and congregations. Let us frequently and affectionately speak to them on their peculiar dangers and duties, and seek to enlist their intelligent sympathy with our doctrines and discipline; and that they 'may be delivered from this present evil world, according to the will of God,' let us strive to lead them to an earnest consecration of themselves to the service of Christ and His Church.

And to secure increased facilities for such ministrations, let us, wherever practicable, make arrangements for obtaining pastoral access, at stated times, to the young persons of Methodist families between the ages of fourteen and twenty-one; with a view to promote their spiritual welfare, by personal instruction, exhortation, appeal and prayer.

CARE FOR THE CHILDREN.

We are convinced of the obligation which rests on all Christian Pastors to feed and take the oversight of the lambs, as well as of the sheep, of the flock of Christ; and we agree to hold, wherever practicable, weekly meetings with the children of our people.

SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

Let us afford to our Sunday-schools all possible encouragement and aid; by attending their Committee and Teachers' Meetings; by visiting the principal Schools at least once in

every quarter; and by giving, as occasion serves, advice and counsel to the Officers and Teachers.

CATECHETICAL INSTRUCTION.

Let us recommend, both in Sunday-schools and in the families of our people, the practice of Catechetical instruction, in order that, 'being rooted and grounded' in 'those things which are most surely believed among us,' our children may in after years 'hold fast the form of sound words.' And let us commend everywhere our own Catechisms.

COTTAGE PRAYER-MEETINGS.

Let us encourage Prayer-Meetings in the houses of our friends at such times as will not interfere with attendance at our Chapels and other preaching-places. For when prudently conducted by persons of established piety and competent gifts, and duly superintended by the Ministers and the Leaders' Meetings, such services are productive of much good among the poor; and have often proved the means of grace and salvation to many who could not, at first, have been reached in any other way.

COTTAGE PREACHING.

In populous neighbourhoods where there is a general neglect of the means of grace already established, let us preach in private houses, especially in the cottages of the poor; that so we may gain access to 'them that are without'; and, by the Divine blessing, bring them under concern for salvation, and win them over to attendance on public worship in the house of God.

FORMING NEW CLASSES.

In our old and large Societies especially, let us from time to time appoint new Leaders, active and zealous men and women, 'of honest report, and full of the Holy Ghost and of wisdom,' and encourage them to form new Classes in suitable neighbourhoods; and let us seek thus to gather into the fold of Christ those persons who, it may be, live at a distance from any chapel, yet are 'not far from the kingdom of God'; but who need special invitation, and are not likely to 'give themselves to the Lord, and unto us by the will of God,' without more than ordinary enterprise and spiritual attention.

VISITATION OF VILLAGES.

In country places, where it is not possible at present to appoint Preachers regularly, let suitable persons attend, under the direction of the Superintendent, for the purpose of public prayer and exhortation, and occasionally to read to the congregation a short and plain sermon, until such places can be supplied regularly with Local-Preachers. And let us conscientiously care for and watch over the country places already on the plan.

OPENING NEW PLACES.

In every Circuit let us try to open new places, and let us try again places which have not been recently visited; and let us not be satisfied until every town, village and hamlet shall be blessed, so far as we can accomplish it, with the means of grace and salvation. And with a view to a revival and extension of the work of God, let us have recourse, even in our old-established Circuits, to the practice of preaching out of doors; seeking, in order to save, that which is lost.

EXTENSION OF METHODISM.

In a word, let every one of us consider himself called to be, in point of enterprise, zeal and diligence, a Home Missionary; and to enlarge and extend, as well as keep, the Circuit to which he is appointed.

OFFICIAL MEETINGS.

In conducting Quarterly Meetings, and all other Official Meetings, let us steadily discourage the spirit of strife and debate, and firmly disallow the introduction of all topics of irritating discussion not legitimately arising out of the proper business of the Meeting. Let us remember that the only way to live in peace is to walk by rule; and in the administration of all our affairs, in the Society and in the Circuit, let us cultivate the spirit and exhibit the manner of men who are acting for God in the service of His Church.

PASTORAL RESPONSIBILITY.

Whilst we readily and cheerfully protect our Office Bearers and Members, in Meetings over which we preside, in the

exercise of such functions as belong to them, according to our laws and usage,—let us not forget that we are under obligation to act on such occasions, not merely as the Chairmen of Public Meetings, but also as the Pastors of Christian Societies; who, by the ordinance of God, and by their own voluntary association with us, are ‘put in trust with’ the Scriptural oversight of their spiritual affairs, and are directly responsible to the great Head of the Church for the discreet and faithful discharge of the duties of that ‘trust.’

CATHOLICITY.

Let us ourselves remember, and from time to time impress upon our people, that we, as a Connexion, do not exist for the purpose of party. If at any time we are tempted to ‘entangle ourselves with affairs’ which are foreign to the exclusive calling of Methodist Ministers, let us resolve, in dependence upon the grace of God, to keep aloof from all merely party purposes, and from party spirit. By the example of our Founder, by the original principle on which our Societies are formed, and by our professions before the world, we are bound to beware of a sectarian spirit, to avoid the appearance of bigotry, and to abstain from disputes on minor subjects of theological controversy. In our occasional intercourse with the Ministers and Members of other Churches, ‘let every one of us please his neighbour, for his good, to edification;’ and towards all denominations of Christians ‘holding the Head,’ let us maintain the kind and catholic spirit of primitive Methodism, and ever show ourselves ‘the friends of all, the enemies of none.’

CONCLUSION.

And being deeply sensible that, in order to the revival and extension of the work of God, the great thing to be desired is an abundant effusion of the Holy Spirit on ourselves and our families, our Societies and our Congregations, we solemnly agree to seek that blessing by humble and earnest prayer; in our private supplications, in our family devotions, and in the pulpit; and we desire to ‘continue with one accord in prayer and supplication’ ‘until the Spirit be poured upon us from on high, and the wilderness become a fruitful field, and the fruitful field be counted for a forest.’

RESOLUTIONS AFFECTING MINISTERS GENERALLY.**KEEPING UP OUR OWN DISCIPLINE.**

In addition to the zealous and faithful preaching of the Gospel in all our congregations, and wherever we can obtain access for that purpose, we once more earnestly exhort our Preachers firmly, vigilantly and affectionately to enforce, in all our Societies, every part of our discipline.

We particularly require that the Societies shall be frequently met, apart from the congregation at large, and suitably addressed on the various relative duties, on the due sanctification of the Sabbath, and other appropriate topics. And that when the Lord's Supper is administered, the Communicants shall be previously required to produce their Society-Tickets, or Notes of Admission, according to our established Rules.

SUNDAY EVENING PRAYER-MEETINGS.

Though the Conference approves of occasional Meetings for Prayer in our Chapels, after the evening preaching on the Lord's Day, as there are seasons when an extraordinary influence may render them proper; yet it advises that such Meetings shall be only occasional, and that the Preachers' ordinary practice shall be to meet the Societies, and give suitable counsel to the various classes of our people.

SPECIAL SOCIETY-MEETINGS.

In addition to the practice of meeting the Societies weekly on the evening of the Lord's Day, the Conference recommends that the Preachers should appoint times, whether once in a month or once in a quarter, for holding Special Society-Meetings, either on the afternoon of the Sabbath, or on some evening of the week, to be devoted exclusively to that purpose; when, if practicable, all the preachers of the Circuit should be present, and unite in endeavouring to make such Special Society-Meetings instructive and useful to our people.

CLASS-MEETINGS.

The Conference cherishes an ever-deepening conviction of the value of that spiritual fellowship with each other which our people have been wont to maintain in a regular attendance on our Class-Meetings; believing that, in this course, the Members

of our Societies of all ages, and all varieties of knowledge, position and attainment, are best enabled to walk comfortably with God, to nourish that simple and ardent piety which is their only safeguard against the dangers and seductions of the age, to train up spiritually-minded Office Bearers for future service, and to prepare to render up their account with joy. The Conference, therefore, exhorts all our Ministers to watch over our Class-Meetings with holy jealousy; to use every effort to maintain them strictly in all their efficiency; and with unceasing diligence, to direct both their public instructions and their private pastoral influence toward this object.

CLASS-BOOKS.

The Conference requires every Minister to see that the Class Books are properly filled up and kept; especially with reference to the insertion of the names and residences of the Members; and to make such use of these books as he may deem necessary for the purpose of Pastoral Visitation.

CLASS-LEADERS.

The Conference enjoins that the attention of the Class-Leaders be again particularly directed to that original Rule of our Societies which requires Leaders to give stated information to the Minister of those Members who are sick, or need to be specially visited.

RECOGNITION OF NEW MEMBERS.

The Conference resolves that it is very desirable to adopt some more public and formal mode of admitting New Members into Society. But that as the circumstances of different Circuits, in town and country, are very dissimilar, it is not expedient to lay down specific Rules as to the exact nature of Meetings to be held for the reception of New Members, or as to the frequency with which such Meetings should be held.

KEEPING IN OUR OWN CIRCUITS.

The Conference enjoins it as a sacred duty upon all the Preachers, and especially on those excellent Brethren who are most frequently selected for such occasions [preaching Anniversary Sermons], to restrict their engagements of that kind within such bounds as will consist with their paramount and indispensable obligations to their own Circuits.

Let a strict inquiry be made by the Superintendent Preacher in the Leaders' Meeting, at least twice in the year, into the moral character of all the Leaders; their punctuality in beginning and ending their Class-Meetings in proper time; and everything that relates to their office.

LOCAL-PREACHERS.

Considering the exigencies of our work, and the fact that our supply of Ministers is drawn from our Local-Preachers, the Conference resolves that it is desirable and necessary that steps should be taken to secure in every Circuit an ample and efficient supply of this most useful class of labourers. And that Superintendents should direct their special attention to eligible young men in their respective Circuits, with a view to their becoming Local-Preachers; and, as far as practicable, should direct their reading and studies to that end.

The Conference further recommends that, wherever it is practicable, a Theological Class shall be formed in each Circuit, for the purpose of assisting the Local-Preachers in their theological studies.

The Conference appoints the following Ministers a Committee to prepare a course of study for the guidance of persons on probation for the work and office of Local-Preachers: the Theological Tutors of the four Branches of our Theological Institution, and the Rev. Dr. Moulton.

PASTORAL ADDRESS TO BE GIVEN.

The Superintendents are directed, gratuitously to furnish to every Local-Preacher, Steward, and Class Leader, in their respective Circuits, a copy of the Annual Pastoral Address of the Conference to the Methodist Societies.

PASTORAL ADDRESS TO BE READ.

The Superintendents are directed to appoint at each principal Chapel in their Circuits, a Special Society Meeting, for the purpose of having the Pastoral Address read to the Society, and made the subject of suitable remarks and exhortations.

INDIVIDUAL RESPONSIBILITY.

The Conference directs that each large Circuit be divided into Sections, according to a mutual arrangement to be made by the Ministers at their weekly meetings; and that each Minister be held responsible for the visitation of his own Section.

OFFICIAL INQUIRY.

The Conference directs that this important department of Ministerial duty be stately made the subject of direct and specific inquiry and conversation, both by the Superintendents of Circuits in their weekly meetings with their respective colleagues, and by the Chairmen of Districts in their several District Meetings.

EVENING VISITATION.

The Conference suggests that the general Ministerial duties of Circuits should, in given cases, be so allotted and arranged as that families, especially among the working classes, which cannot be collected or found during the day, may be visited in the evening.

WEEKLY CHILDREN'S MEETINGS.

The Preachers are solemnly enjoined to hold, wherever practicable, regular weekly meetings with the Children of our people, under the age of fourteen, on the most convenient day of the week, in every town where a Preacher has his stated residence, according to our ancient rule and practice. And inquiry shall be made in Ministers' Meetings, and in the May District Meetings, respecting the observance of this regulation.

JUNIOR SOCIETY-CLASSES.

The Conference resolves that Junior Society-Classes which directly provide for the religious instruction and training of young people—which have as their object the awakening of Christian sensibility, and the development of Christian experience and character, and which for these purposes specifically make use of Scripture instruction—shall be generally established in connection with our Societies.

EXAMINATION IN CATECHISM.

The Conference recommends the Superintendents of Circuits, wherever they may find it practicable, to make arrangements, in conjunction with the Sunday-school Committees, for the

Annual Public Examination in the Catechism of the Children of our Sunday-Schools ; and that such examination shall, where possible, be held in the Chapels.

ROLL OF MEMBERSHIP.

Every Superintendent is required to leave for his successor an exact list of the names of all the Members in his Circuit, arranged in their several Classes and Societies, as found at the preceding Midsummer Visitation.

THE TWELVE RULES OF A HELPER.

1. Be diligent. Never be unemployed. Never be triflingly employed. Never *while* away time, nor spend more time at any place than is strictly necessary.

2. Be serious. Let your motto be, 'Holiness to the Lord.' Avoid all lightness, jesting and foolish talking.

3. Converse sparingly and cautiously with women, particularly with young women.

4. Take no step towards marriage without solemn prayer to God, and consulting with your Brethren.

5. Believe evil of no one, unless fully proved ; take heed how you credit it. Put the best construction you can on everything. You know the judge is always supposed to be on the prisoner's side.

6. Speak evil of no one ; else *your* word, especially, would eat as doth a canker. Keep your thoughts within your own breast till you come to the person concerned.

7. Tell every one what you think wrong in him, lovingly and plainly, and as soon as may be, else it will fester in your own heart. Make all haste to cast the fire out of your bosom.

8. Do not affect the gentleman. A Preacher of the Gospel is the servant of all.

9. Be ashamed of nothing but sin. No, not of cleaning your own shoes, when necessary.

10. Be punctual. Do everything exactly at the time. And do not mend our Rules, but keep them ; and that for conscience' sake.

11. You have nothing to do, but to save souls. Therefore spend, and be spent in this work. And go always not only to those who want you, but to those who want you most.

12. Act in all things, not according to your own will, but as a son in the Gospel, and in union with your Brethren.

As such, it is your part to employ your time as our Rules direct : partly in preaching and visiting from house to house ; partly in reading, meditation and prayer. Above all, if you labour with us in our Lord's vineyard, it is needful that you should do that part of the work which the Conference shall advise, at those times and places which they shall judge most for His glory.

Observe : It is not your business to preach so many times, and to take care merely of this or that Society, but to save as many souls as you can ;—to bring as many sinners as you possibly can to repentance, and, with all your power, to build them up in that holiness, without which they cannot see the Lord.

And remember, a Methodist Preacher is to mind every point, great and small, in the Methodist Discipline. Therefore you will need all the grace and all the sense you have, and to have all your wits about you.

NOTE.—In 1847, after an exhaustive inquiry, the Conference found that, owing mainly to 'the disproportion between the number of Members and Pastors, it would be unreasonable to expect that personal visits of the Minister could be made to *all the extent* that is desired.' And in order to a 'full accomplishment' of the work of Pastoral Visitation, the Conference desired 'an *increase of Ministers*'; and 'suggested that our Circuit Stewards and lay friends generally should consider the best and most prudent means of procuring and supporting such an increase in their several localities.'

Gradually, the 'increase of Ministers' has been 'procured,' and they are 'supported'; and 'the disproportion between the number of Members and Pastors' has been diminished,—not to say removed. In 1847 the average number of Members to each Minister in Circuit work was 344; in 1883, it was 258. Taking the Connexion generally, and in relation to the number of Members, there are now four Ministers where then there were three. This is the exact ratio of 'increase of Ministers' in proportion to the number of Members. In 1847, three Ministers had the charge of 1032 Members; $3 \times 344 = 1032$. In 1883, four Ministers had the charge of 1032 Members; $4 \times 258 = 1032$.

As the following table will show, the present Connexional

average number of Members to each Minister varies considerably. In eight Districts the number of Members per Minister is under 200; in nine Districts it is between 200 and 250; in ten districts it is between 250 and 300; in six Districts, it is between 300 and 400; and in two Districts, it is over 400.

APPENDIX XII.

ORDER AND FORM OF THE BUSINESS OF THE CONFERENCE.

N.B.—The Conference Prayer-Meeting is to be held during the first day of the Conference at a convenient hour.

V.—Reception of Representatives from other Conferences; reading of Addresses; and appointment of Committees to draft Replies.

VI.—Presentation of Memorials; reading Suggestions from District Committees; and appointment of Committee on Memorials and Suggestions.

VII.—Appointment of Committees:—

- (1) On Appeals, and other Cases;
- (2) To report on Chapel cases which affect discipline;
- (3) To revise the draft of the Pastoral Address.

VIII.—Presentation of any documents which are, or may be, legally required to be forthcoming at the Conference.

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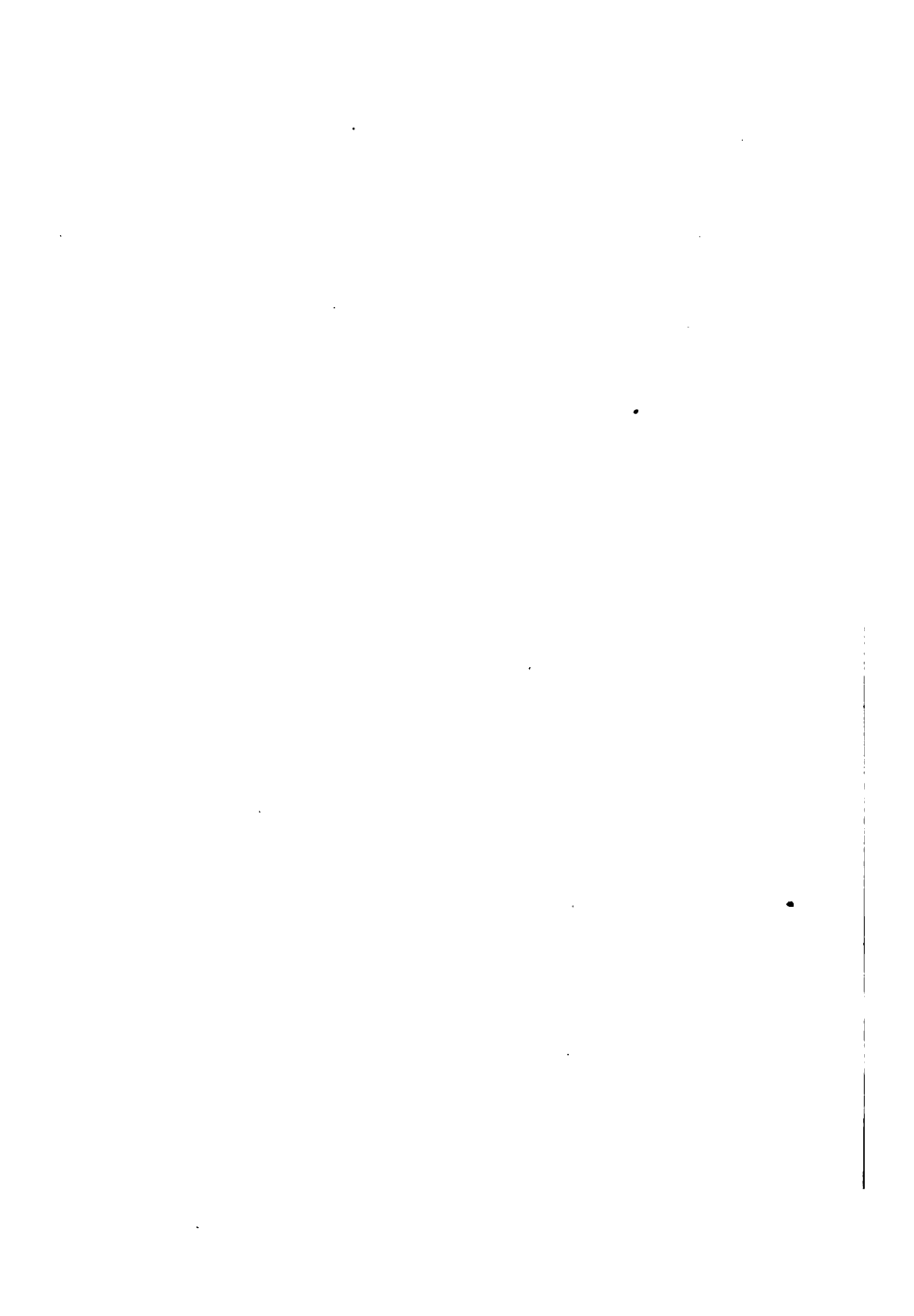
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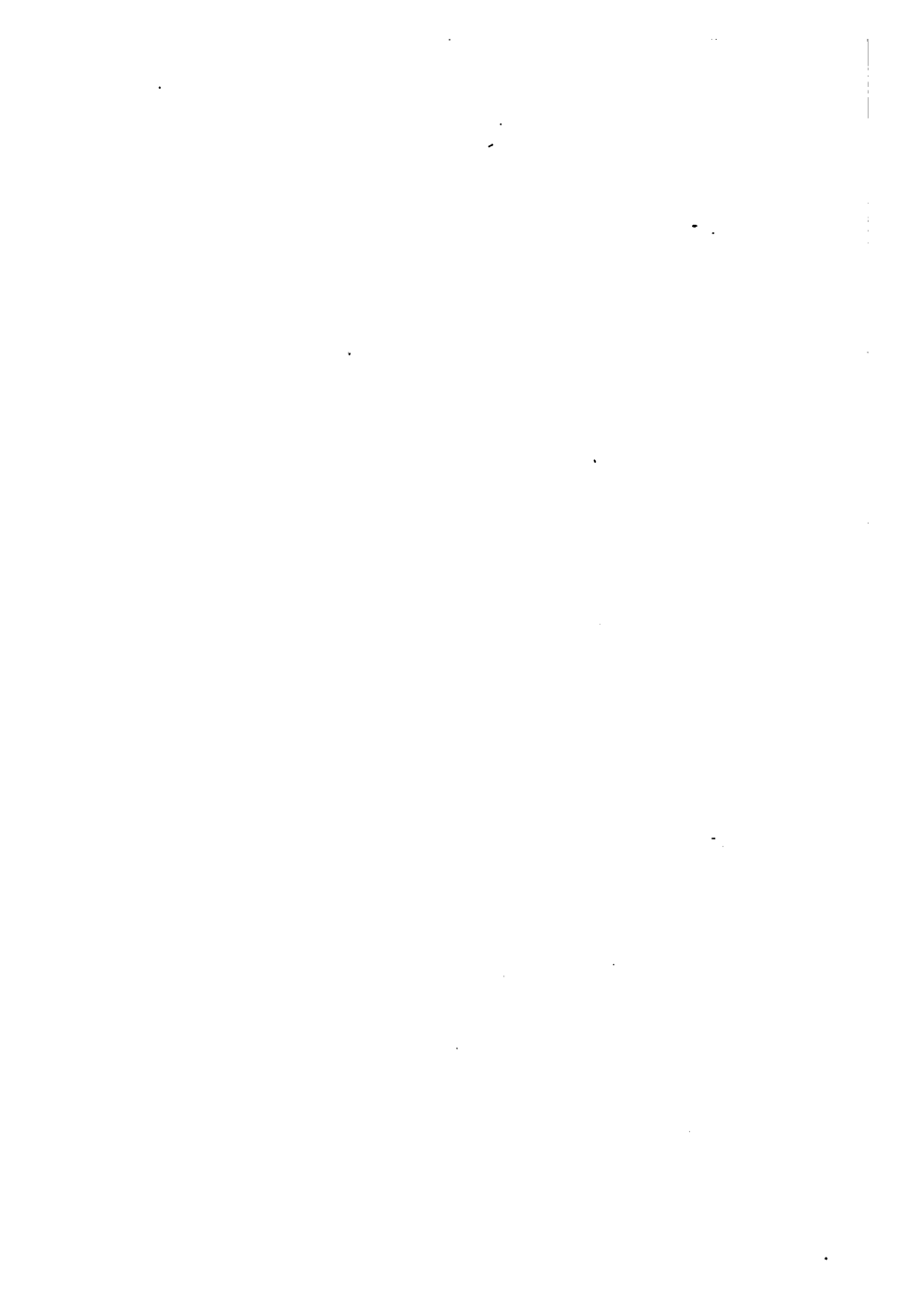
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
