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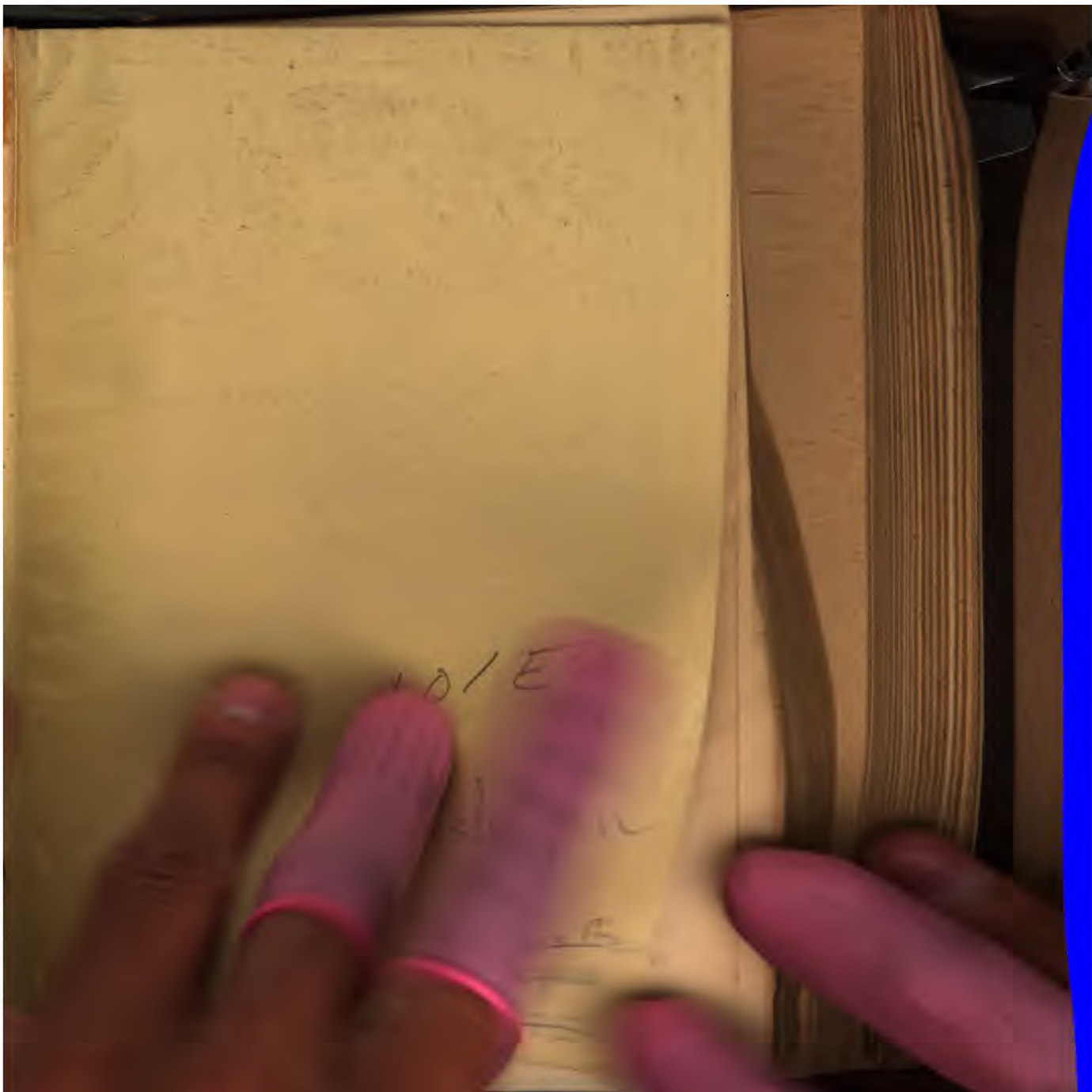

THE Yearly Conference of the People called Methodists, in the Connexion established by the late Rev. John Wesley, A.M., assembled in Camborne, on Tuesday, July 24th, 1888, and concluded its sittings on Thursday, August 9th, 1888.

The number of the Legal Conference was completed by the election of Francis W. Greeves, John Rhodes (B), John V. B. Shrewsbury, David Hill, and James Wilson, in the place of Benjamin Hellier, John Harvard, George Walker, Alexander Puddicombe, and John Donor Powell, deceased.

THE REV. JOSEPH BUSH was elected President of the Conference, and the REV. DAVID JAMES WALLER was elected Secretary.

The following Supernumerary Ministers, Edward Lightwood, William Andrews, George Barnley, and John Hay were declared to have ceased, by lapse of time, to be Members of the Legal Conference. The following Ministers, Thomas Chope, Joseph Nettleton, Samuel Lord, and T. Tapley Short, M.A., were elected in their place.

**Q. VI. What Ministers have DIED since the last Conference?**

**A. 1. In Great Britain, thirty-nine, viz.,—**

(1.) **WILLIAM HARLEY**; who was born at Liverpool in 1823, and died at Hornsey, in the Highgate Circuit, on August 6th, 1887. Blessed with godly parents, he was in early life the subject of deep religious impressions, and in the thirteenth year of his age obtained a conscious sense of acceptance with God. He entered our Ministry in 1847, and laboured for thirty-nine years with great zeal and acceptance. He was a faithful and earnest preacher of the Gospel, and his ministry was frequently honoured of God in the conversion of souls.

In some of his Circuits he was permitted to witness gracious revivals of religion, notably in the Deal Circuit, where many of the soldiers stationed there were turned to God. He was a kindly and judicious Superintendent, diligent and successful in pastoral work, and showed more than ordinary ability in dealing with Circuit finance and in the erection of new chapels. For some years before his death he was almost sightless, and for the last two years he endured much affliction, which he bore with remarkable patience and resignation, giving frequent testimony of the comfort and hope which he found in God, and of his firm confidence in the Atonement.

(2.) ROBERT COOKE; who was born in Howden-on-Tyne, in 1812. His parents were devoted Methodists, and a godly training led to his conversion at the age of fifteen. Very soon he became a Local-preacher and Class-leader, and was at once remarkably useful. In 1834 he commenced a career of forty-six years' spotless ministerial life, the greater part of which was spent in his native and adjacent counties. Alston was the first, and Gateshead, in which he was stationed three times, the last scene of his active labours. In Alston a great revival broke out, in which hundreds were saved. His whole course was marked by wisdom to win souls. Everywhere he was exceptionally blest in bringing sinners to Christ and Christians into perfect love. His last years were spent in Elswick Road Circuit, Newcastle-on-Tyne, where his constant pastoral visitation, his Class-leading, and his preaching were highly prized. On Christmas Day, 1886, he joyfully, though in much physical weakness, delivered his last message.

His final affliction was long and severe, but his patience never wavered, and his joy in God was constant and very great. Just before passing away he whispered his favourite word, 'Allelujah!' 'I am so happy!' 'Jesus, Jesus!' He passed away on August 10th, 1887. 'Father Cooke,' as he had come to be called, revealed to the end a gentle, sympathetic heart. He was a most faithful and loving colleague and pastor. His nature, refined by grace, shone in its cheerful, hopeful thankfulness. Little children loved him. The sick, sad and aged found in him a friend. His sermons, rich and true to our theology, were expository and practical.

(3.) WILLIAM WINTERBURN; who was born at Huddersfield in 1813. When fourteen years of age he joined his father's Class, and therein found the Saviour. He commenced his ministry in 1835, and for forty years continued to fulfil its manifold work with singleness of eye and whole-hearted devotion. His remaining years, passed in cheerful submission to the Divine will, beautifully completed his life. He 'brought

forth fruit in old age.' His preaching always secured favour with the more thoughtful of his hearers, his sermons being the product of a vigorous mind, cultivated by wide and ceaseless reading. To many souls he was 'the savour of life unto life.' To Christian truth he bore no faltering witness; and he laid special emphasis on the doctrines which Wesleyan-Methodism accentuates. His loyalty to our Church order was tested and perfected through the suffering he endured on its behalf in the earlier years of his ministry. His character was not merely 'blameless,' but 'lovely.' 'In simplicity' he was 'a child,' in understanding 'a man.' To his colleagues he was ever frank, faithful and brotherly.' To the flock of Christ he was a watchful and unselfish overseer. Toward all men he was gentle and kindly. He died at Urmston, suddenly and full of peace, on the 10th of August, 1887, having preached and administered the Lord's Supper on the previous Sunday evening.

(4.) HENRY GOODE FAULL, son of the Rev. John H. Faull; who was born at Ayton, Yorkshire, in 1834. He was converted to God in early life, and soon afterwards began to preach. He received an appointment to the Lancaster Circuit in 1858. He continued in Circuit work for fifteen years, when he was permanently laid aside. As a Circuit minister he was strictly conscientious and faithful. He was an acceptable, evangelical and useful preacher. His visits to the homes of the people were helpful to many who still remember his counsels and prayers. In the young also he took a special interest. His character was excellent, his disposition amiable, and he was much beloved in all his Circuits. During the fifteen years of his retirement, most of which were spent at Wath, he was only able to preach a few times. But, in the spirit of self-sacrifice, he worked beyond his strength; meeting a Class, helping at the quarterly visitation, and visiting the sick. Two years before his death he had to give up all Church work; yet, under the pressure of increasing physical and mental prostration, he was



patient, resigned and trustful. He lost the power of speech six days before his departure. He fell asleep in Jesus on the 22nd of August, 1887.

(5.) HENRY B. BRITTEN; who was born at Charlton, in the Midsomer-Norton Circuit, in 1804. His parents were members of the Established Church. He attended one Sunday evening the Methodist chapel, with the intention of disturbing the worshippers, but the sermon resulted in his conversion to God. He soon afterwards began to preach, and in 1825 was accepted as a candidate for the Ministry. He was appointed in 1826 to the West Indies, where he laboured with great success for ten years. His health failing, he obtained leave of absence, and spent eight years in the home work. In 1844 he was appointed to Jamaica, and gave a second term of nine years to the foreign work. During a fearful visitation of cholera and yellow fever, he was incessant in attendance on the sick and dying. Broken down with exhausting labours, with sunstroke and repeated attacks of fever, he was compelled to return to England. After a brief rest, he entered again into the home work, but could not continue in it more than two years. In 1856 he became a Supernumerary.

As a preacher he was very earnest, practical and affectionate, powerful in appeals to the conscience, and as the result of his ministry many were added to the Lord. He was expository, very tenacious of Methodist doctrine, teaching clearly in every sermon the way of salvation. During his long retirement he found happiness in occasional preaching and constant pastoral visitation. He finally settled at Churchill, where the last years of his life were spent in great content and thankfulness. He visited the sick, helped the poor, and was a messenger of mercy to many. He said: 'I am as happy as I can be here below.' After a few hours' illness he passed to his eternal rest, August 22nd, 1887, in the eighty-fourth year of his age, and the sixty-third of his ministry.

(6.) JAMES YOUNG; who was born at Brownhill, Yorkshire. He was converted in early youth, became a member of the Society, and was speedily employed in the Sunday-school and as a Local-preacher. In 1877 he was accepted as a candidate for the Ministry, and was sent to Didsbury, where his character and conduct won the confidence and esteem of the governor and tutors. His brief career in Circuit work showed him to be godly, sober-minded, and of single purpose; a plain, earnest, thoughtful preacher, a diligent pastor caring for his people, and a genial and brotherly colleague. In 1887 he was appointed to the Clitheroe Circuit. He married shortly after the Conference, and while upon a brief holiday was seized with fatal illness. The sudden summons found him ready. There was a sharp physical conflict; but praise conquered the pain and fear of death, and, glorifying God, he entered into rest, having just completed the seventh year of his ministry.

(7.) JOHN S. VICKERS; who was born at Gateshead, in 1825, was the son of loyal and devoted Methodists. He was converted when fourteen years of age, and soon evinced tastes and habits which foreshadowed his future course. He was educated at Wesley College, and after three years' training at the Didsbury Branch of the Theological Institution, he entered the Ministry in 1850. He was a diligent student of the Holy Scriptures, and his sermons abounded with apt quotations. He took a great interest in the young, and in most of his Circuits had a Children's Bible-class. He studied to be quiet, and to do his own business, and the Lord was with him. During his last year's ministry he caught a cold, which resulted in rheumatic fever, to which he succumbed sixteen months after at Tynemouth. His great sufferings were borne with patience. He died in peace, October 8th, 1887, in the sixty-third year of his age, and the thirty-eighth of his ministry.

(8.) WILLIAM BUTTERS; who was born at Hibaldstow, Lincolnshire, in 1810. His parents were members of the

Wesleyan-Methodist Society, and his mother had suffered much persecution in early life because of her devoted adherence to the Methodists. A few days before his twentieth birthday he found peace through believing, and from that time gave himself wholly to the service of God. He was received into the Ministry in 1833, and in 1834 was sent as a missionary to Van Diemen's Land. There he at first laboured among the convicts at Port Arthur, and many remarkable cases of conversion encouraged him in his work. He served Methodism in Tasmania more than sixteen years, and was greatly owned of God in the conversion of souls. In 1850 he was appointed to Melbourne, where he laboured with marked success. In 1858 he was elected President of the Australasian Conference. In 1862, after twenty-nine years of active uninterrupted service in Australasia, failure of health obliged him to rest, and he returned to England, attending the Conference of 1863 as Representative of the Australasian Conference. He became a Supernumerary, and resided in the Brixton Hill Circuit during the remaining twenty-four years of his life. After a few hours' illness, he died on the 10th October, 1887.

Mr. Butters was a preacher of great power, of sound judgment and wide tolerance; a wise administrator, unsparing of himself in the performance of his duties. He was a warm friend, and greatly beloved as a pastor. His long life, alike by its untiring work and courage in service and by its serene and strong patience in the years that followed, bore indisputable testimony to his unwavering faith and hope in God through Christ.

(9.) HENRY PADGHAM; who was born at Playden, in Sussex, in 1816. In early life he was connected with the Established Church, but being invited to attend a Missionary prayer-meeting and cottage service, conducted by the Wesleyan-Methodists, he was led to the Saviour, at once began to meet in Class, and in a few months was placed on the Plan as a Local-preacher. In 1839 he was accepted by the Conference as a candidate for the Ministry,

and sent to the West Indies, where, for twenty years, he toiled with much acceptance and success. In 1864 his health failed, and he was compelled to return to England. He was able to take a Circuit, but was again compelled to retire. The last four years of his life were spent, as a Supernumerary, at Askern Spa, in the Doncaster Circuit, where he was most active, doing all his strength would permit. He preached almost every Sabbath, and during the summer months conducted a service for the visitors in the open air. His visits to the sick were much blessed. His preaching was practical and useful, and as a pastor he was diligent and faithful. His death was somewhat unexpected, but he was ready. His last words were: 'I am going home; I am trusting in Jesus.' He died on the 13th of October, 1887, in the seventy-second year of his age, and the forty-ninth of his ministry.

(10.) WILLIAM POWELL (A); who was born at Penderyn, Brecknockshire, in 1807, was brought to God in early life, and at the age of seventeen began to preach. He laboured with great success as a Local-preacher on several Circuits in the South Wales District until 1829, when he was accepted by the Conference as a candidate for the Ministry. He held firmly and taught faithfully the truths by which his own spirit was sustained. He lived in habitual communion with God. He greatly excelled as a preacher. His sermons were thoroughly practical; yet set forth Gospel truth in vivid analogies, delivered in a manner which always interested and often thrilled his hearers. His original treatment, his wealth of illustration, and his simplicity of language, added to his sweet and penetrating voice, rendered him one of the most popular preachers of the Principality.

Failure of health compelled him in 1866 to become a Supernumerary. He resided at Llanfyllin for thirteen years, during which he rendered valuable service to the Cause. His declining years were spent at Llangollen. Towards the close of life it was a great trial to him to be precluded from

active work, and at times he was much depressed. He was naturally of a despondent disposition. He was, however, greatly consoled by the thought that 'They also serve who only stand and wait.' His last words were: 'O the thought of peace and rest!' He peacefully entered into rest on October 15th, 1887, in the eightieth year of his age, and the fifty-ninth of his ministry.

(11.) JOHN WALTERS; who was born at Bilston in 1811. Under the teaching and influence of Christian parents he was converted to God when about sixteen years of age. He entered heartily into Church work, became a candidate for the Ministry in 1834, and was sent at once into the Circuit work. His religion was decided and deep; high-toned Christian principle governed his spirit and his whole life; he was the soul of honour. His religious experience and attainments were apparent in his life. He was well and widely read, and kept himself abreast of questions of the day. His intellect was clear and penetrating, and his views and convictions showed the working of an independent judgment. Of a nervous temperament and delicately sensitive mind, he was very retiring, yet was cheerful and buoyant. He was very painstaking and conscientious in every part of his work. His sermons were carefully prepared, thoughtful, spiritual, helpful to the Church, and often won sinners to Christ. At times he prayed and preached with mighty power. His pastoral work in the Classes and in the sick room was full of sympathy and consolation. As a Superintendent he was faithful, judicious and fearless in the execution of duty. After forty-three years of active service he settled in Leeds, continuing to work as long as strength sufficed. His last sickness was somewhat severe, but borne with Christian resignation and in the abundant comfort of the Holy Ghost. He died October 29th, 1887, aged seventy-six years.

(12.) ALEXANDER PUDDICOMBE; who was born at Beaford,

Devon, in 1817. In 1835, at Bideford, he was drawn by curiosity to attend a service at the Methodist chapel, where he heard a sermon by the Rev. James Grose, and commenced meeting in Class, and began to make himself useful in the work of the Lord. After spending about four years in business, he felt constrained to become a candidate for the Ministry. In 1843 he received an appointment to the Sherborne Circuit. A memorable revival broke out while he was there. He gave himself fully to the Lord and to His work. His aim in preaching was to save and profit his hearers. His sermons were thoroughly evangelical, and enforced with affectionate earnestness. His frequent visits to the homes of the people endeared him to old and young. His special aptitude for business affairs was turned to good account in his various Circuits. His brightness of spirit and animation of manner increased as he grew older.

Without reproach, upright, amiable and courteous, he was a trusted friend and a sympathetic colleague. He took the deepest interest in Connexional affairs, and few were better acquainted with the details of our system. He was elected into the Legal Conference at the last Conference. He had just entered upon a third year at Buckingham, where he was universally beloved, when the summons came suddenly. On Sunday, November the 6th, 1887, he walked two and a half miles and preached twice. In the evening, in reply to a friend who remarked that he should not have taken the services that day, he said: 'If my work is nearly finished, the will of the Lord be done.' He was taken home, retired to rest, and passed away in sleep, being seventy years of age, and in the forty-fifth year of his ministry.

(13.) JAMES FORD, who was born in Gloucester in 1819. Blessed with a godly home training, he early manifested a deeply religious spirit. He was accepted for our foreign work, and in 1846 was sent out to Fiji. His health having failed, he returned to England in 1850. From this time, for thirty-three years he exercised his ministry with great acceptance

and usefulness in the home work, chiefly in the large towns of Lancashire and Yorkshire. His sensitive and retiring disposition inclined him to a studious rather than an active life, hence he was not very widely known; but he was loved and revered by those who knew him best, and his colleagues found him kindly and considerate. His sermons manifested a firm hold of evangelical truth, and were very carefully prepared, full of thought, and beautiful in diction: they displayed a wide knowledge of men and things, and were highly prized by his most intelligent hearers. Failing strength compelled him to retire at the Conference of 1883. Almost immediately afterwards he was quite incapacitated from all work by a sad but painless affliction which continued till the close of his life. He died in London, on November the 7th, 1887, in the sixty-ninth year of his age, and the forty-second of his ministry.

(14.) OWEN OWEN; who was born at Dolgelly in 1812. He was endowed with an exceptionally strong frame, received a liberal education, and entered the medical profession. He led a careless, godless life up to twenty-three years of age, at which time he went to a Wesleyan village chapel near his home for the purpose of caricaturing the preacher and service amongst his ungodly companions. God 'darted keen conviction' into his heart. His conversion was instantaneous and thorough. Soon afterwards he became a Local-preacher, and entered our Ministry in 1840. He laboured with great success for thirty-eight years in the South Wales District and in the Manchester Welsh Circuit. In 1878 he became a Supernumerary, residing at Pontypridd, still rendering exceptionally efficient service each Sabbath day, and often on week-days, up to his death. He 'died in harness.'

His rare mental abilities were cultivated by constant reading and study. He was notably conversant with Mental and Moral Science in their relations to Biblical and moral questions, and thoroughly acquainted with the writings of Wesley, Fletcher and Watson. His sermons were fine productions—massive,

clear, full of evangelical truth, delivered with great power, effectiveness and unction. His popularity was great, and of the best order, throughout the Principality. He had a fine nature, and was loved by all who knew him. His whole life was true, upright, manly, noble, manifesting 'the beauty of holiness.' When the end came, he was ready. Amongst his last words were these: 'I am not afraid. The glorious Gospel truths which I preached for so many years surround me now like the everlasting hills.' He died on the 15th of November, 1887, in the seventy-fifth year of his age, and the forty-eighth of his ministry.

(15.) ROBERT BOND; who was born at Werekham, Norfolk, in 1802. His parents were acquainted with Mr. Wesley, and assisted in the introduction of Methodism into West Norfolk. Very early in life he found peace with God, and when fourteen years of age began to call sinners to repentance. He rendered valuable service in London and in the West of England as a Local-preacher. He entered our itinerant work in 1829 as a married man, his first appointment being to his native Circuit, Downham. Twenty-nine years later he was elected Chairman of the Norwich and Lynn District, and for several years Mr. Bond honourably sustained a similar position in other Districts of the Connexion. He possessed an acute and carefully cultivated mind, stored and improved by conscientious diligence. His preaching was very acceptable, and turned many to righteousness. He was permitted to witness remarkable revivals of the work of God in his Circuits, particularly in Wakefield and Redruth. While stationed at Wisbech his name was associated with the famous 'Gedney' case, which secured to our Societies the peaceful enjoyment of a well-defined and legal right. His pen enriched the pages of our Connexional Magazine, supplied many tracts, and produced several small volumes of devotional literature, one of which, *Sabbath Musings*, has been widely circulated, and the means of remarkable conversions.

Retiring in 1873 from the full work of the Ministry, he



spent a few years in Suffolk, and then settled in York, delighting still to preach and to visit. He was never unemployed, never weary in well-doing. He was in the pulpit on the 13th of November, 1887, but the effort of preaching proved too great, and he was taken home in a state of prostration. A few days he waited, not able to speak much, but full of hope. The day before his death he said in exultant tones: 'I love the Lord! Bless the Lord, O, my soul!' continuing for a time in the same strain. He entered into rest, November the 25th, having been a preacher of the Gospel for seventy-two years.

(16.) JOHN HARROP; who was born in Derbyshire, 1820. Converted to God in youth, he entered the Ministry in 1846, and was appointed to the Gold Coast, Western Africa. Within a year he was compelled, by failing health, to return home, but not before he had been instrumental in leading some of the children of Ham to the Saviour. In 1849 he was appointed to Gwennap, where he took part in a revival, which left a deep impression upon his mind. He laboured with zeal and acceptance in Circuit work until 1878, when affliction compelled him to retire.

Mr. Harrop was of a meek and humble spirit, faithful and evangelical in preaching, indefatigable in visiting the flock, and conscientious in every detail of Circuit duty. He was much esteemed by his colleagues for his high character and unflinching courtesy. The latter part of his life, spent in Southport, was clouded by severe affliction, which sometimes induced mental depression, but not a murmur escaped his lips. The New Testament and the Hymn-book were his constant companions. 'I have just had a glorious manifestation; the room was filled with light,' he said to a friend, shortly before his death. He sank peacefully to rest on December 5th, 1887, in the sixty-eighth year of his age, and the forty-second of his ministry.

(17.) WILLIAM JACKSON (B); who was born at Sancton, Yorkshire, in 1821. He came of an old Methodist family: his

father was a faithful leader in our Society for more than fifty years. Three of his father's brothers entered our Ministry and attained an eminent position: Thomas and Samuel were each Presidents of the Conference. Mr. Jackson was converted in early life, and soon began to exercise his gifts in preaching. In 1845 he was accepted as a candidate for our Ministry, and was sent to Didsbury, where he spent three happy years. For nearly forty years he preached with vigour and faithfulness the Gospel of the grace of God. His preaching was full of tenderness and spiritual power. In his intercourse with others he was humble yet fearless. He never forced himself into notice, but his words always showed a mind so active, original and discriminating that they at once commanded attention, and were not soon forgotten. His conversation was always marked by cheerfulness, and often by kindly humour and quaintness of expression, full of wisdom. In his home life his piety and cheerfulness were striking. The strength of his faith and the depth of his devotion were beautifully manifest in his last most painful illness. Several times during his last week on earth he said: 'It is all Christ; Christ is mine and I am His.' His last words were: 'I am all right, thank God.' He died at Christchurch, December 16th, 1887.

(18.) THOMAS NATTRASS; who was born at High House, Weardale, in 1828. At eighteen years of age he yielded himself to God. In 1850 he was accepted as a candidate for our Ministry; and after an honourable course at the Didsbury Branch of the Theological Institution, he did efficient work in several of our most important Circuits. His preaching was full of 'instruction in righteousness,' and was charged with spiritual power. In his character, manliness and modesty were equally conspicuous. His ability and courtesy, his brightness and geniality, greatly endeared him to our people. He was a devoted pastor, a loyal colleague, and a capable and conscientious Superintendent. He made the work and oversight of his own Circuit his first care and study. Whilst counting upon

years of service in the Church he loved so well, Mr. Natrass was suddenly called away. On Sunday morning, December 18th, 1887, he preached in Bowdon chapel with more than usual vigour. His evening appointment was in Vicarage Lane chapel, and he commenced the service by giving out with great fervour :

'Jesu, Thy blood and righteousness  
My beauty are, my glorious dress ;  
Midst flaming worlds in these arrayed,  
With joy shall I lift up my head.'

As the congregation sang this verse, he threw up his arms, and seemed about to fall. He was borne to the vestry, and in a few moments he entered into life eternal, in the sixtieth year of his age, and the thirty-fifth of his ministry. He 'walked with God, and he was not ; for God took him.'

(19.) **FREDERICK SLIGHT** ; who was born at Carlton, Notts, in 1808, and entered the Ministry in 1832. Most of his long and laborious life was spent in the larger Circuits in the Midland Counties. He gave special attention to the young, by whom he was greatly respected and beloved. He made careful preparation for the pulpit, and his sermons were highly appreciated. He was a thorough Christian, gentle, cautious and kind. A large proportion of his income was devoted to the cause of God and to the relief of the poor. During his residence as a Supernumerary at Sawley, in the Castle-Donington Circuit, his visits and fatherly counsels were made a great blessing to the Society. After a few days' illness he peacefully passed away on 22nd of December, 1887, aged seventy-nine, and in the fifty-sixth year of his ministry.

(20.) **JOHN RYAN** ; who was born at Devonport, in 1811. In 1828 he was led to religious decision, and joined the Wesleyan Society. In 1834 he was accepted as a candidate for our Ministry. From that period till 1880 he spent the greater part of his ministerial life in the Circuits of Devon and Cornwall, labouring with much acceptance and success.

He evinced singular ability in expounding and applying the Word of Truth, and his sermons were racy, logical and practical. As a Superintendent he was able, energetic and faithful. In 1880 physical infirmity compelled him to become a Supernumerary. He settled at Gravesend, where, as he could, he cheerfully exercised his gifts, to the profit of many. To the last he used his influence wisely and well. His last illness was very brief; but he whispered: 'It is all right;' and fell asleep on January the 5th, 1888, aged seventy-six years, and in the fifty-fourth year of his ministry.

(21.) PETER PARSONS; who was born in Salisbury, in 1810, and passed to eternal rest in Devonport, January 15th, 1888. He was converted at the age of fifteen, and soon became useful in the Church. He laboured in the Wesleyan-Methodist Itinerancy during forty years, and as a Supernumerary filled fourteen more with profit to the Circuit in which his remaining days were spent. His preaching was eminently evangelical. His sermons were carefully prepared, plain and pointed, and delivered with pathos and much power. His ministry was more than ordinarily owned of God in winning souls. He always insisted on the fundamental truths of repentance, faith in Christ and regenerating grace, and was never more happy than when earnestly pointing souls, weary of sin, to the Lamb of God. He was permitted to rejoice in many revivals of religion in the Circuits in which his ministry was exercised, and the Lord gave him much fruit of his preaching. Many who were converted by his instrumentality remain to this day useful officers in the Church.

As a colleague he was cordial and courteous, as a pastor diligent and kind, sympathising with the sick and sorrowful. In most of his Circuits he spent three years, and in several he fulfilled a second term. In many of his Cornish Circuits he might be seen on the quays, amongst pilots and fishermen, inviting them to the Lord's house, and many of these found the Saviour. His memory is fragrant, and his 'works follow'

him. The years of age and feebleness found him patient, peaceful, and full of hope. Calmly waiting for the change, and steadfastly looking for the Lord Jesus Christ, in the light of a 'good hope through grace,' he finished his course in the fifty-fifth year of his ministry.

(22.) JAMES KILVINGTON; who was born at Whitby in 1842. His parents were Methodists. At the age of seventeen he confessed Christ, ascribing his conversion to home influence. He at once began to work in the Sabbath-school and cottage services. He became very useful as a day-school teacher, and spent two profitable years at Westminster Training Institution, going thence to St. Helen's Day School. He was accepted as a candidate for the Ministry in 1867, his first Circuit being Luton. He was an ardent, continuous student, ever seeking, by patient research, to grasp the truth of the Gospel. His preaching was both solid and attractive, and very profitable to every class of hearers, whilst his modest, gentlemanly bearing and quiet earnestness in doing good commended him to all. He was exceedingly diligent, painstaking, and persevering in visiting the flock, although, on account of his retiring disposition, this involved great self-sacrifice. He did very good service among the young people, and gladly and efficiently conducted classes for their special improvement.

He was compelled, by failing health, to become a Supernumerary in 1886. He visited Australia by medical advice; there he met with great kindness from several friends, and very favourably impressed them with the depth and fervour of his Christian principles. In his last illness, at Melbourne, he was for a little while subject to great depression, but by grace he soon overcame this, and showed by cheery words and looks that his heart was fully resting in God. He expressed a strong wish sometimes to live for his family, but specially that he might work more earnestly for the Master. He said several times to a minister: 'We are only half in earnest; I wish I could be spared to begin my ministry afresh.' To Mrs. Kil-

vington he said: 'If I get better we must live fully to Christ; religion must be the one thing in our home.' Being asked if he were afraid to die, he replied with confidence: 'No.' To a question as to whether he was happy, he replied with much emphasis: 'Perfectly.' He said that he apprehended, after having suffered so much, he might have a hard time in the swellings of Jordan; but when he passed over, the river was beautifully calm. Without a parting groan or struggle he went to the glorious Ministry of heaven on January 23rd, 1888.

(23.) JOHN KNOWLES; who was born near Lamberhead Green, in the Wigan Circuit, in 1823. His mother was a niece of the Rev. William Atherton, and to her godly training he owed the best influences of his life. The death of his father brought him to decision, and he found 'the forgiveness of sins.' At once he began to teach in the Sunday-school, to be a Prayer leader, and shortly after a Local-preacher. Thomas Champness was a scholar in his class. The originality and force of his school lessons are remembered to this day. At this time he wrote a prize essay on Protestantism. He often made grateful reference to the help given him at this period in Theological Classes, conducted by Dr. Osborn and Mr. Rattenbury.

In 1849 he entered the Ministry, and for nearly forty years loved it more than his life. He was of quick intelligence and ceaseless activity, straightforward, courageous, gentle, unswerving and unwearied. His ministry was instructive, original, experimental, practical, profitable, and of unflinching interest. It was easy to trace the influence upon his preaching of his two early teachers. He was a diligent pastor. Taken from among the working class he understood them, and they understood him. His tender sympathies and Christian cheerfulness made him always welcome, especially in the sick room. He was very helpful to young men; his last strength was expended in forming classes to aid them as he had been aided. His care extended to the concerns of every-day life, and many were greatly helped in their worldly affairs by his wise

guidance. He speedily won confidence by the manliness of his character. His Circuits were encouraged by his hopefulness; he was so brotherly, whole-hearted and self-forgetting. His religious life was robust, fervent and joyous.

He died, February, 1888, in the midst of the joy and toil of a blessed revival. His last few hours were characteristic. He had his Circuit book before him, and gave to his son some jottings about his work. His family knelt around him, and over them he pronounced the priestly benediction. He exclaimed: 'Victory! victory! through the blood of the Lamb.'

(24.) RICHARD HORNABROOK (A); who was born at Egloskerry, near Launceston, in 1802. His parents, members of the Established Church, were conspicuous for integrity. His mother, who had great force of character, sought to train her children aright. To a sermon on death, which she read to the family one Sunday afternoon, her son traced his first awakening to the reality of unseen things. He was the fruit of village Methodism. His clear and unmistakable conversion took place when he was about seventeen years of age. At considerable sacrifice he at once joined the Wesleyan-Methodist Society, and soon after began to preach. With great diffidence, he eventually consented to become a candidate for our Ministry, and in 1827 was sent to the West Indies, where, with one brief interval, he laboured for nineteen years. He was a pioneer missionary. It was his great joy to break up new ground for the Gospel. He filled, besides, several of our most important Stations in the West Indies with much acceptance. After completing forty-two years of active service, of which twenty-two were spent in some of our most laborious English Circuits, he became a Supernumerary. The last three years of his life were beclouded by heavy affliction, which he bore with exemplary fortitude. 'Patience had her perfect work.'

He was naturally bright and genial. He was possessed of a sound judgment and a well-cultivated mind. His preaching was expository, forceful and instructive. He was eminently

faithful in the discharge of the duties of the pastoral office. There was a robustness about his character which commanded universal respect, whilst his kindness and generosity endeared him to a very wide circle of friends. His courtesy was instinctive. He was gentle toward all men. He had a chivalrous sense of honour, and was a fine example of the 'charity' that 'thinketh no evil.' He was notably of a conciliatory spirit. His piety was deep. 'He walked in peace and equity, and turned many away from iniquity.' His last broken accents were: 'Going home.' He died at Halton, near Run-corn, on February the 23rd, 1888, in the eighty-sixth year of his age, and the sixty-first of his ministry.

(25.) BENJAMIN HELLIER; who was born at Wick St. Lawrence, near Bristol, in 1825. He was blessed with a godly home, and was brought up under the teaching of the Established Church. He traced his first religious impressions to the Wesleyan hymns that his mother sang to her children. In early youth he came to the knowledge of salvation. The need of spiritual fellowship drew him to the Methodist Society. His gifts as a preacher were soon called into exercise amongst his friends and neighbours. From childhood he was possessed by a great love for learning, which was fostered by a liberal education. He resigned, however, the prospect of entering the University, in order to serve the people of his choice.

In 1844 he was called to the Ministry, and admitted as a student at the Richmond College. In 1847 he was appointed Assistant Tutor at Didsbury; and from that time, with the exception of six years' diligent service in the regular Ministry, he continued to labour in various departments of the work of the Theological Institution. During twenty years he held the office of Classical Tutor, at Richmond and Headingley successively; and for the last ten years of his course was House-Governor of the latter Branch of the Institution. For this sphere his disposition and acquirements eminently fitted him. His teaching was marked by method and clearness of style,



by fresh and accurate scholarship, by sound judgment and independent thought. His conversation was full of shrewd and kindly wisdom. His daily life was a continual blessing to those around him. He combined, in an unusual degree, frankness and pleasantness of temper with dignity and authority. He was a man of strict conscience, of high integrity and moral courage, and habitually devout. His character won the reverence of young men; his sagacity and long experience made him skilful in dealing with them: he trusted them, and made them worthy of trust. They 'arise up, and call him blessed.'

His public ministry was greatly valued and widely useful. In its manly simplicity, its rich instructiveness, its sober earnestness, its deeply evangelical spirit and aim, it reflected the best qualities of his mind and heart. His pastoral labours, both within the Institution and in other circles, have left an abiding blessing. He was a true and careful shepherd of souls.

In 1884 he delivered the Fernley Lecture on *The Universal Mission of the Church of Christ*, a subject that in his later years increasingly absorbed his thoughts. *The Salvation of Children* was also a question that lay very near his heart, on which he did not a little to arouse and instruct the conscience of the Church. Not less suggestive and stimulating was his teaching on the practical aspects of *Christian Sanctification*, and his life sustained his doctrine.

In 1886 he was elected Chairman of the Leeds District, and speedily set on foot a project, likely to bear good fruit in the future, for the Extension of Methodism in Leeds. In the course of the next year his physical strength rapidly declined. Notwithstanding his hale appearance, his health had never been robust, nor capable of enduring any excessive strain. During his last illness his sufferings were severe; but his mind was cheerful and perfectly composed. 'I am happy,' he said; 'for Christ is always with me. I have said a hundred times before, and I repeat it now: "All my trust on Him is stayed."' He fell asleep on the 8th of March, 1888.

(26.) JOHN HARVARD; who was born in Pimlico, in 1819, and died at Lewisham, April 1st, 1888. He was converted to God in Westminster Chapel in 1834. In 1840 he was accepted by the Conference as a candidate for the Ministry, and admitted into the Theological Institution at Hoxton, where he spent two years, and was appointed in 1842 to the Gloucester Circuit, and for forty-five years was usefully and honourably employed in the full work of the Ministry. In 1887 he asked permission to become a Supernumerary, and by a special resolution the Conference placed on record its high appreciation of his character, and of the eminent service he had, for a long period, rendered to the Connexion as Secretary and Treasurer of the Schools Fund, as Governor of Wesley College, and as Chairman of important Districts. Shortly after the Conference he became the General Secretary of the London Mission, and gave himself to his new duties with his wonted diligence, courtesy and thoroughness; and the Mission was greatly advantaged by his counsel and services. He was present at a meeting of the Committee a few days before his death. After a brief illness, he entered into rest on Easter Sunday.

As a preacher, Mr. Harvard was evenly and uniformly excellent. He did not exhaust himself in the production of occasional sermons, but week by week he gave of his best to his own people. Clear in arrangement, chaste and lucid in diction, warm in tone, and earnestly evangelical, his sermons were well adapted to secure the end of preaching. His devout spirit and reverent bearing were such as 'becometh the Gospel of Christ,' which it was his joy to proclaim. There was in him a rare combination of the qualities which go to make a model Pastor. He was gentle, yet firm; dignified, yet affable; a pattern of ministerial propriety; and a skilful administrator. 'By pureness, by knowledge, by kindness, by love unfeigned,' he predisposed others to look favourably upon his plans and proposals. As the Superintendent of a Circuit and the Chairman of a District, his administration was one of 'life and

peace.' By his brethren Mr. Harvard was greatly beloved and trusted; and he never disappointed their expectation when they put him in trust with high office. Without asserting authority, he maintained it; and by quiet devotion to his own work he won the active sympathy of others. His efficiency as a minister was built upon his excellence as a man; and, by the grace of God, he was an example of 'Whatsoever things are lovely' and of 'good report.'

(27.) SAMUEL BEARD; who was born at Sandwich, in 1802. His godly parents cherished every religious feeling and principle in their child, and, from the earliest period of his recollection, he had a measure of the fear of God. When about fourteen years of age he joined the Methodist Society, and soon gave indications of usefulness. His first sermon resulted in the conversion of the late Rev. Joseph Pascall. His diffidence kept him from entering the Ministry until comparatively late in life. His ministry was peculiarly owned of God. In several of his Circuits there were extensive revivals, notably at Epworth, Barnstable, Taunton and Portland, the effects of which remain to this day. His piety was full of zeal united with great prudence and discretion. As a Superintendent, he was firm and judicious, beloved by his colleagues; and, by his modest and gentlemanly demeanour, he won the esteem and affection of the people. He excelled in pastoral visitation; his visits were often blessed to the conversion of souls, and still more frequently to the strengthening of believers, and comforting of the sick and dying. His sermons, carefully prepared, exhibited depth of thought, and great insight into the mysteries of the Kingdom of God. Severe family affliction compelled his retirement from the active work of the Ministry, and for twenty-one years, with a short interval, he devoted himself to the work of Methodism in the Kilburn Circuit. There his memory will long be cherished as a faithful minister, a wise and judicious Class-leader, a trusted friend and counsellor, who never shrank from any duty to which the Master called him. After ten days of

extreme suffering, he exchanged mortality for life on April 3rd, 1888, in the eighty-sixth year of his age, and the fifty-second of his ministry.

(28.) ROBERT LEWIS (A); who was born at Haughton, Cheshire, in 1815. In childhood he was continually compassed about with Christian influences. As a youth, he was a thoughtful, diligent and interested student of the Scriptures; but it was not until he was nineteen that he intelligently and consciously realized that he was a child of God through faith in Jesus Christ. In 1839 he was called to the Christian Ministry. The continuity of his ministry was broken, more than once, by a throat affection.

He was a man of more than ordinary intellectual power; he was devout, tender and full of lofty aspirations, and was most honourable and upright. His sermons evinced careful preparation, extensive reading and ability to feed the Church of God; and his Christian deportment, genial and sympathetic nature, and gentlemanly manners fitted him for pastoral work. His administration was marked by faithfulness, firmness and kindness; winning the affectionate esteem of his co-pastors and his flock. In 1878 he permanently retired from Circuit work. By his Christian life and service, he endeared himself not only to his own Church, but to both rich and poor of other Churches. His last affliction was long. His last testimony, uttered in great weakness, was that he had 'perfect peace.' He departed early on Sabbath morning, April 22nd, 1888, in the seventy-fourth year of his age, and the forty-ninth of his ministry.

(29.) GEORGE WALKER; who was born at Ripon, in 1828. Blessed with Methodist parents and a Sunday-school training of which he often spoke with gratitude, he was led to Christ at the age of sixteen, and twelve months later preached his first sermon. In 1848 he was accepted as a candidate for the Ministry; and after a three years' course at Didsbury was

appointed at first to country Circuits, and afterwards to some of the most important towns in the manufacturing districts. His preaching was able and effective, his sermons being prepared with great care, and attended with soul-converting power. He manifested very considerable administrative ability. He was painstaking in attending to business details, firm and fearless in enforcing Methodist discipline, and successful in dealing with financial difficulties. He served the Connexion faithfully as a member of several important Committees; and for eight years was laboriously engaged as Minute Secretary to the Chapel Committee. As a colleague and as a friend he was true. He was elected into the Legal Conference last year; and this mark of the confidence of his brethren greatly encouraged him whilst engaged in a long and painful struggle in the public vindication of truth and righteousness. His death came quite unexpectedly. On his removal to Oldham, he apparently had before him several years of active service; but a severe cold developed into inflammation of the lungs, and after a few days of suffering, he passed to his reward, on April 23rd, 1888, in the sixtieth year of his age.

(30.) THOMAS MORRIS; who was born at Aberffraw, Anglesey, in 1811, and died at Denbigh, April 30th, 1888. He began to preach at the age of twenty-one; and laboured with great success as a hired Local-preacher on the Llangollen Circuit for more than three years. He was appointed to a Circuit in 1841, and diligently worked for the Master in some of the principal Circuits in the North Wales District, and also in Manchester (Welsh) until 1881, when he became a Supernumerary, and resided at Denbigh. In declining years he preached regularly, and took care of a Class nearly to the end of his days. His sermons were prepared with much care, and delivered with great freedom and fervour. His appeals to the unconverted were forcible, and his exhortations to believers rich and edifying. His mind was strong and well-cultivated. He was a fluent speaker, with a good voice. His popularity

as a preacher was the result of the sanctified use of such qualifications. Many were turned to righteousness under his practical and powerful preaching. He was devotedly attached to the Church of his choice, and a faithful administrator of Methodist discipline. As a pastor he was wise and careful. His latter days were bright and cheerful, and his last illness was borne with Christian resignation. One of his last utterances was: 'I want to go home.' He passed away full of peace.

(31.) **THOMAS THOMAS (A)**; who was born at Carnarvon in 1839. He was blessed with pious parents and a godly training, and at the age of fifteen was brought to decision through the instrumentality of his Sunday-school teacher. In 1861 he was accepted as a candidate for the Ministry. After a year at Richmond College he was appointed to Aberystwith. All his Circuits, except the last four, were Welsh. At Wigton he rendered excellent service, strengthening Methodism in all its interests. At the last Conference he was appointed to Ulverston, where he manifested much anxiety to promote the welfare of the Circuit, especially its spiritual prosperity. He was in excellent health until April, when in the midst of arrangements for the District Meeting to be held in the Circuit, he was smitten with erysipelas, which after eight days terminated fatally on the 1st of May, 1888, in the fiftieth year of his age, and the twenty-sixth of his ministry. For the last few days he was generally unconscious; but shortly before the end was permitted to testify that the angels of God were his 'ministering spirits,' and that he was about to 'depart and to be with Christ.' The last text from which he preached in Ulverston, a few days before his illness, was: 'I am now ready to be offered, and the time of my departure is at hand.' He was marked by cheerful piety, genial kindness, freedom from prejudice, great forbearance and ardent desire for usefulness. He was assiduous in reading and study, and published several theological works in the Welsh language. He was greatly honoured and beloved.

(32.) WILLIAM BAKER (B), son of the late Rev. William Baker (A); who was born at Tiverton, in 1818. Converted to God in early life, he began to preach the Gospel when fifteen years of age. Two years later he was received as a candidate for the Ministry, and sent to the Institution at Hoxton, and a few weeks afterward to the Hereford Circuit. He laboured with diligence, fidelity and success for forty-three years in some of the most laborious Circuits; but was never known to speak disparagingly either of the people or the Circuits. His character was of transparent simplicity and uprightness. He ever showed the 'meekness of wisdom, and the wisdom of meekness;' and exemplified the perfection of the 'man who offends not in word.' Calm under provocation, he passed without reproach and without blemish through some of the most trying times in the history of our Church. Of a kind and sympathetic nature, he always won the respect and affection of the people of his charge. His discourses were calm, clear and solid; and, 'profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness.' He was apt in sowing the 'seed of the kingdom.' His preaching was always appreciated by his more cultured hearers, while the illiterate could understand and profit. Never troubled by 'phantom doubts,' he yet cherished catholic views. He was emphatically a man of prayer, and always approached God as a Father and Friend. The *Devotions* of Bishop Andrews was his favourite companion. Retiring from the active work of the Ministry in 1878, he continued to render valuable service as his strength would allow. During the latter part of life he was a great sufferer, but bore his pains with cheerfulness and resignation. His last illness was short and severe. He frequently and exultingly repeated:

'I shall behold His face,  
I shall His power adore,  
And sing the wonders of His grace  
For evermore.'

Calmly resting in the Everlasting Arms, he fell on sleep, at Monmouth, on the 7th June, 1888, in the seventieth year of his age, and the fifty-third of his ministry.

(33.) JOHN SKERRATT; who was born near Crewe in 1840. He was of Methodist parentage, his father having been a useful Local-preacher for forty years. When about seventeen years of age he was brought to God at Holyhead under the ministry of the Rev. John M. Bamford, and forth with began to work for God. Accepted as a candidate for the Ministry in 1861, he, after studying for two years under Dr. Kessen, was sent out to Madras. His work as a missionary was entered upon with great zeal and devotion, and gave promise of a successful career. The climate, however, compelled him, at the end of three years, to relinquish a work he greatly loved, and he returned to England with his physical and nervous vigour permanently weakened. As a preacher, he was judicious and faithful in his exposition of the Word; as a Superintendent, while seeking to live peaceably with all men, he was firm in the administration of discipline; and as a colleague, loyal, kind and sympathetic. In house to house visitation he was systematic and conscientious. Between the Conference of 1887 and the District Meeting of 1888, his pocket-book showed a record of over one thousand visits. His ministerial work was often temporarily interrupted by bodily weakness, preventing the full recognition of his abilities, and of his upright character and devout spirit. After a short but severe illness, he suddenly finished his course at Aberystwith, on June 13th, 1888, in the forty-eighth year of his age, and the twenty-fifth of his ministry.

(34.) GEORGE MATHER; who was born in 1821, at Brampton, near Chesterfield. His parents were members of the Established Church. While a lad he began to attend the Wesleyan chapel, and under the influence of the teaching he heard there, he was led to seek and find conscious forgiveness. He



joined the Society, and began to make himself useful. He removed to Sheffield to learn a business, and while there became a Local-preacher, and offered himself for the Ministry. In 1844 he was placed on the President's List, and began his ministry the next year at Wellington, Salop; and during a ministry of forty years 'served his own generation' well and faithfully in several of the principal Circuits of Methodism.

He had a special gift of persuasive speech, and a keen appreciation of 'the beautiful in nature and morals.' His ministry was a great blessing to many. As a pastor he was diligent and faithful; and his gentle, unobtrusive goodness and genial manners won numerous friends in all his Circuits. Many years of successful and acceptable labour told upon his strength; and having lost his voice, he retired in 1885 to Southport, hoping that for a few years he might still render some service to the Church. But disease slowly undermined his mental and physical powers, and he was suddenly struck down by paralysis, on June the 22nd, 1888, in the sixty-eighth year of his age.

(35.) JOHN WARD; who was born at Newark, in 1815, was converted to God in early manhood. In 1839 he entered the Ministry, and for thirty-eight years of full activity he laboured in it as 'a workman needing not to be ashamed.' He gained in all his Circuits the love and confidence of the people, and in many his name is a household word. His preaching was characterized by thoughtful simplicity, and by practical and earnest directness. It was well suited to the Yorkshiremen amongst whom, for the greater part of his career, he lived. In several places it was effectual, through God's blessing, in the conversion of considerable numbers. As a colleague and a Superintendent he was peculiarly beloved. His oversight of the flock combined careful attention to individuals and to details, with judicious provision for the whole. He deeply interested himself in collecting and publishing reminiscences of the past local history and descriptions of the existing con-

dition of Methodism in many of the Circuits in which he travelled. This special work has not been among the least useful of his life. Copies of his books are kept in many chapel-trust deed-chests. For eleven years he was a Supernumerary in the Melton-Mowbray Circuit, surrounded by a people whom he loved. Amongst them he died, July 5th, 1888, in the seventy-third year of his age, suddenly but peacefully, in full reliance on the merits of Him Whom he had so faithfully preached.

(36.) WILLIAM DAVIES (D); who was born at Pontrhydygroes, near Aberystwith, in 1851. By the example and training of religious parents, he was led in early life to a saving knowledge of Christ. In 1873 he entered the Ministry, and faithfully discharged its duties to the profit of those amongst whom he laboured. His integrity was unbending. His preaching was clear and instructive, evangelical and practical; his appeals were earnest, and at times powerful. His tender sympathy and wise counsel produced the happiest effects, and he was highly esteemed in the homes of our people. He loved his work, and continued it as long as his strength lasted. For a few days his sufferings were severe, but he expressed a tranquil resignation to the will of God. Just before his spirit passed away he said: 'I should like to live a little longer to work for God, but His will be done.' His experience was clear, and his death triumphant. He peacefully passed away July 12th, 1888, in the thirty-seventh year of his age, and the fifteenth of his ministry.

(37.) THOMAS OSBORN; who was born at Leah, Cornwall, in 1818. He was converted to God when about fourteen years of age, and when seventeen years old he was put into charge of a Class, in which were included several of the older members of his own family. About the same time he began to preach; and being much owned of God, he was separated to the ministry of the Gospel in 1843. To the work of the

Ministry he gave himself with complete devotion. His richly evangelical preaching greatly edified the Church. He was ready 'to banish and drive away all erroneous and strange doctrine contrary to the Word of God.' His pastoral visitations were specially blessed; and his administration of the affairs of a Circuit was remarkably discreet and thorough. His health failed in 1875, whilst he was Superintendent of the Macclesfield Circuit. The remainder of his life was spent chiefly in the Bristol (Clifton) Circuit. His last three years, however, were deeply shadowed by personal and family affliction. When it was impossible for him to speak more than a syllable or two at a time, by unmistakable signs he betokened the sure refuge of his soul in the Rock of Ages, and the joy with which he anticipated the heavenly home. Into that home he entered on the 13th July, 1888, in the seventy-first year of his age, and the forty-fifth of his ministry.

(38.) **SAMPSON REYNOLDS**; who was born in Cornwall in the year 1830. He was converted to God in early life, and soon after became a Local-preacher, and in due time entered upon the work of a minister. His practical and profitable ministry was highly appreciated. He was modest and amiable. Soon after the last Conference his health began to fail. While on a visit to Harrogate, with a full trust in Christ, he peacefully expired on the 24th of July, 1888, in the fifty-eighth year of his age, and the thirty-second of his ministry.

(39.) **JAMES CLAPHAM**; who was born in 1813, at Cross Hills, Yorkshire. Brought up under the influences of a godly and kindly home life, and with a temperament naturally gentle and susceptible, he early gave evidence of the operations of the Divine Spirit in his heart. His conversion took place at the age of thirteen, at home, while his father was praying at family worship. At the age of seventeen he was made a Class-leader, in which office he was remarkably successful; when eighteen years of age, he had nearly one hundred members under his

care. As a Local-preacher he was 'wise to win souls,' and gave evident promise of the power which characterized his ministry.

Having been accepted by the Conference as a preacher on trial, he was appointed in 1836 to the Bury St. Edmunds Circuit, and continued in the Norwich and Lynn District for seven years. There are still some who gratefully and affectionately remember his early ministry. From that time his influence as a preacher increased year by year, until his services were sought by many of the most important Circuits of the Connexion. He was made Chairman, at various times, of the Liverpool, Bristol, York and Sheffield Districts, proving wise in counsel and prudent in administration, and making himself beloved. His sermons were remarkable for lucid exposition and graphic power. Few men have been more at home in the Scriptures. His intimate and accurate knowledge of Bible scenes and localities enabled him to place the incidents, with which it was his delight to deal, in striking and picturesque settings, which brought them home with great vividness to his hearers. But his power lay in more than this. His intellect was of considerable grasp and insight; and his character, which showed a remarkable combination of integrity with extreme modesty and gentleness, gave him a strong hold upon the hearts of his hearers. As an advocate of Foreign Missions he was remarkably effective.

In 1877 he retired from the regular work of the Ministry, and settled at Wolverhampton. In later years he was frequently a great sufferer, and for some time had almost entirely withdrawn from public life. Shortly before he died, referring to the pains of his fatal illness, he said: 'It is not the way I should have chosen, but it is a good way, and I am not like a man who has no home to go to; I have a good home, and a sure hope.' Into that home he entered while asleep on July 26th, 1888, in the seventy-sixth year of his age, and the fifty-second of his ministry.

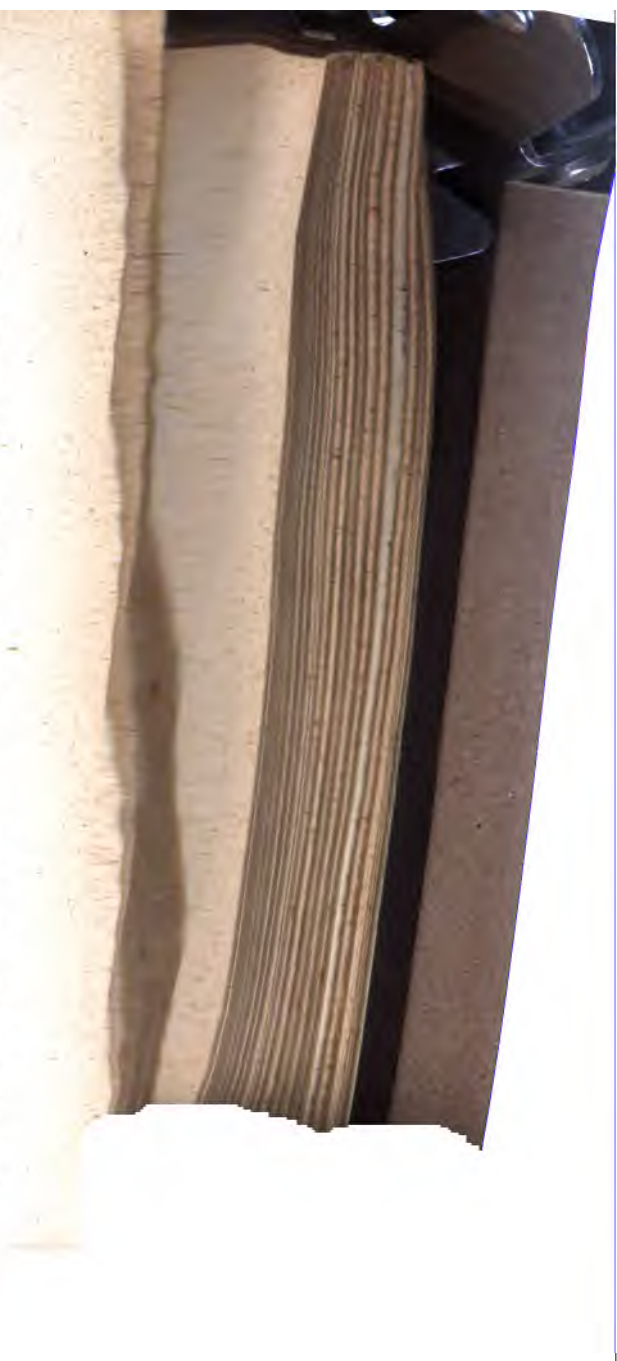
2. In Ireland, *ten*, viz.,—

(1.) ROBERT JOHNSTON JONES; who was born near Irvines-town, on 11th March, 1848. His parents were godly; and when thirteen years of age he experienced the saving grace of God. In the year 1873 he was accepted by the late Primitive Wesleyan Conference as a candidate for the Ministry. His character was unblemished, and he was genial and hearty. He was never heard to speak a harsh word, and in him there was no guile. His preaching was very earnest, and much owned of God. Last Conference he was appointed for a second year to the Ballycastle Circuit, wherein, under pressing circumstances, he effected cheering improvements.

At the August District Meeting he seemed full of health and spirits, and bade fair for a long and happy life, but his sun went down with impressive suddenness. His death resulted from sleeping in a damp bed when absent from his Circuit on Connexional business. His sufferings were keen, but he was patient. A few minutes before his death he was talking in his usual way, when a severe fit of coughing snapped the silver cord, and the released spirit entered into everlasting life, on the 16th of September, 1887, in the fortieth year of his age, and the fifteenth of his ministry.

(2.) ROBERT BLACK; who was born in Cookstown in 1812. He was favoured with a godly home. The death of his parents while he was very young led him to decide for Christ. In 1834 he assisted the Rev. John Holmes in the Castlebar Circuit, in connection with the revival in Westport, during which the Rev. William Arthur, M.A., was converted. He offered himself as a candidate for our Ministry, and was accepted in 1836. In some of his Circuits there were revivals, much of the fruit of which is to be found to-day. Failing health compelled him to become a Supernumerary in 1872, when he took charge of the Society and congregation at Passage-West, and for six years laboured as strength permitted.

During the few weeks of his last illness he sometimes suffered



great pain, but never murmured; he was calm, gentle and patient, and frequently expressed strong confidence in his loving Saviour, Whom he had preached for so many years. He expressed a wish to partake of the Lord's Supper, and while the simple service was being conducted joined heartily in the responses. Such words as 'It is no cunningly devised fable;' 'I have preached Jesus for years; He won't forsake me now,' fell from his lips. When asked: 'Are you happy?' he replied, 'Yes, very;' these were his last words. Soon afterwards he fell asleep, on the 4th of October, 1887, in the seventy-fifth year of his age, and the fifty-second of his ministry.

(3.) JAMES HUGHES; who was born at Aghnamullen, in 1802. In 1823, under the powerful preaching of the Revs. George Burrows and John Armstrong, he was deeply convinced of sin, and enabled to rejoice in a clear sense of the pardoning love of God. In 1830, he was appointed to a Circuit, from which period for forty-three years he occupied an honourable place in our Ministry with more than ordinary acceptance, and many were won to Christ through his instrumentality. His preaching was truly evangelical, expository and instructive; often original and quaint in expression, at times dramatic and effective in a high degree. His ministry was highly prized, particularly by the more thoughtful of the people, and much of its freshness and charm remained to the close of his career. He stately visited from house to house with an energy and diligence that seemed to know nothing of fatigue, and as a visitor to the house of affliction or of mourning, no one could be more tender or welcome. His somewhat reserved and dignified bearing at such times entirely changed. He was an admirable Superintendent, who gave his whole mind to the work of Christ under his care. On becoming a Supernumerary, he took charge of the Society at Portrush, where he preached twice every Sabbath, and during the week also, his removal to Warrenpoint about eight years ago.

While there, although in venerable age, he preached twice every Sabbath, and on a week evening; and never, perhaps, was more effective than during the last summer of his life.

He was blessed with a constitution of uncommon vigour. But with impressive suddenness he was called to exchange the sword for the palm. He preached twice on the first Sunday in October, 1887, with great enlargement of heart. During the week, while on a visit in Belfast, he became seriously ill, and within a few days returned home to die. His strength rapidly declined, but his heart was strong in the grace of Christ. He spoke with difficulty, but the name of Jesus lingered on his lips, as his spirit passed from earth to heaven. The new church at Warrenpoint was erected mainly through his zeal and labour. He died October 19th, 1887, in the eighty-sixth year of his age, and the fifty-eighth of his ministry.

(4.) ROBERT HAZLETON, M.A.; who was born in the neighbourhood of Dungannon in 1823. While young he was converted to God through the instrumentality of Methodism, and joined the Society. He soon became convinced that he was divinely called to preach the Gospel. He was, by the Conference of 1850, appointed to the Dungannon Circuit, where he laboured with acceptance. His subsequent appointments included some of the most important Circuits. On being sent to Queenstown in 1870, he was dissatisfied with the condition of our trust property there, and undertook to visit America in this behalf, and the result of his mission is the beautiful and commodious church and manse in that town, erected at a cost of over three thousand pounds. At the call of the Conference in 1873 he entered upon that of raising funds for the erection of Wesley College, Dublin. He visited America, Australia and New Zealand, and collected four thousand pounds. In 1878 he was appointed to Omagh, but it soon became evident that his robust frame was beginning to give way. It pleased God a few years subsequently to call him to pass through sore family affliction, and the blow was severely felt, and within a

year his health was completely shattered. He went to reside at Queenstown, where he gradually became weaker. During the few months that he lingered he manifested much Christian patience and resignation. On October 31st, 1887, he passed away in the sixty-fourth year of his age, and the thirty-eighth of his ministry.

(5.) JAMES IRWIN; who was born at Broomhill, Fermanagh. When young he went with his mother to the Class-meeting, where he was early convinced of sin, and obtained assurance of adoption into the family of God. As a hired Local-preacher, the Lord made him instrumental in winning souls. In 1848 he was appointed by the Primitive Wesleyan Conference to the Maguiresbridge Circuit. For thirty-four years he travelled several of the most laborious Circuits, and was owned of God in the conversion of many. He faithfully attended to every part of the work. His brethren elected him President of the Conference. As a preacher he was truly evangelical, earnest and deeply impressive; his peculiar delight was in revivals, with many of which he had the happiness of being associated. He was a most diligent pastor, visiting the flock constantly from house to house. By this means he became a favourite with the people, especially with the poor and afflicted. In the year 1882 his health was so impaired that he became a Supernumerary. After two years' rest he took charge of our Church in New Ross, where he was highly esteemed for his work's sake, and for more than three years discharged the duties of his office often with many infirmities of the flesh, but strong in the Lord and in the power of His might.

On last Christmas Day he preached twice, and announced for the Watch-night service, which he expected to hold; but his work was done. On the 5th of January, 1888, he peacefully fell asleep in the Saviour, Whom he had loved and served for about fifty years. During his brief illness his submission was complete, his faith strong and his hope full. When asked if he could trust Christ fully, he answered emphatically: 'O



yes!' He was of a nervous, impulsive temperament, over which he often grieved; but as a Christian minister he was unostentatious, kind, and generous. He died about the sixty-eighth year of his age, and in the fortieth of his ministry.

(6.) THOMAS W. BAKER; who was born in Dublin in 1821. His parents were members of the Established Church, but he was led, when young, to attend the services held in the Gravel Walk Chapel, where he was brought to know himself as a sinner, and obtained conscious pardon. In 1847 he was appointed to the Tipperary Mission. From that time till about a year before his death, with the exception of one year in which he was laid aside through affliction, he laboured diligently, and not unsuccessfully, in the work of the Lord. He was a faithful minister of Christ. His gifts were considerable, and his mind was cultivated by well-directed and diligent study. He was a careful expositor of the Word of God. His quiet earnestness made itself felt by his hearers. In his attention to the varied details of a minister's work he was all that could be desired; the material and the spiritual interests of the Circuits under his care were well looked after. He was genial and lovable. At times he suffered considerably from depression of spirits, but was never gloomy, and never let go his confidence in his heavenly Father. His first sermon was preached in the Trim Circuit, and in the same Circuit, more than forty years afterwards, he preached his last. In 1886 he was laid aside from active work. At the Conference of 1887 he retired on the Supernumerary list, confidently expecting, however, that a year's rest would restore him. But in Jersey, on the 29th of January last, he entered his eternal rest, in the sixty-seventh year of his age, and the forty-first of his ministry.

(7.) EDWARD CONDELL; who was born at Carnew, Wicklow, in 1857. His parents brought him up 'in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.' When fourteen years of age he was convinced of sin, and filled with joy and peace through

believing. After some years he became convinced that he should devote his life to the work of the Ministry. Having been accepted by the Conference he spent two years at the Methodist College, and in 1883 was appointed to the Newry Circuit. Everywhere he won the esteem and affection of all who knew him. His sermons manifested more than ordinary ability, were expository, had much freshness and originality, and were delivered with great earnestness and power. He was loving and faithful in dealing with souls, and unintermittent in efforts to promote their well-being. He was thoroughly devoted to his work. While in Londonderry his health broke down. At the last Conference he again undertook Circuit duties; but in a short time he was completely prostrated. In January he removed to Wicklow, where he calmly awaited the summons from above. He suffered intensely, but was enabled by Divine grace to bear all with uncomplaining patience, never seeming to wish his sufferings less. He said to a friend: 'I never had thorough happiness till I could say: "I dare not choose my lot; I would not if I might." And I can say that now.' As the end drew near, he said: 'I want you, when I have gone up above, to join in singing

"Praise God, from whom all blessings flow!"'

Almost his last words were: 'Glory! glory! glory!' He fell asleep in Jesus on the 10th of February, 1888, in the thirty-first year of his age, and the sixth of his ministry.

(8.) ANDREW CULLEN; who was born near Sligo, in 1848. He was favoured with a religious training, and was converted at a time of special services in Drum, conducted by the Revs. C. H. Crookshank, M.A., and John O. Park, in 1872. He was accepted by the Conference as a candidate for the Ministry in 1877. Having spent two years in the Methodist College, Belfast, he entered upon the work of the Ministry, travelling in some of our very laborious Circuits, in all of which he had the joy of seeing fruit of his labour. In pastoral work he was

most faithful. He was fearless in reproofing sin, though unobtrusive and retiring. He was much in prayer and the devout study of the Word, and his preaching was simple, direct and earnest, aiming steadily at the glory of God, and reaching the conscience and heart. Though not very robust, he never spared himself in any department of his work. When laid aside from the active work of the Ministry, and called to tread the pathway of suffering for the remainder of the journey, he bore afflictions with the utmost patience, showing that he was fast ripening for the garner above. The end came suddenly at Bournemouth, on the 19th of March, 1888. He 'entered into the joy of his Lord' in the fortieth year of his age, and the eighth of his ministry.

(9.) JOHN HUGHES; who entered into his Master's joy in the eighty-fifth year of his age, and the fifty-third of his ministry. He was born in Portarlinton in 1803, and died at Ballybrittas, on 13th April, 1888. Converted when thirty years old, the vigour with which he had conspicuously pursued worldly pleasures was instantly transferred to heroic devotion to his Saviour, and the self-denying labours of his 'first love' were a forecast of a life whose one vocation was the promotion of the Kingdom of God. In 1835 he entered the Methodist Ministry, in whose ranks with 'uncorruptness, gravity, sincerity, sound speech,' he laboured with great faithfulness for more than half a century. He was a man of rare gifts, an original and vigorous thinker, logical and deeply philosophic. His reading was wide and varied, and unaided he attained to considerable proficiency in classic literature. A careful student of history, he also watched current events with a sagacity which years ago formed opinions almost prophetic of present movements. His poetic faculty was within the circle of his friends a spring of joy.

His preaching was chiefly expository; yet he reasoned with convincing force, and appealed with an energy that sometimes touched vehemence. With noble self-devotion, he was a

champion of Scriptural stewardship in our financial economy. He spoke and wrote in a fashion that was too trenchant for other than the 'liberal souls,' but which bore good fruit in an improved order of sustentation. He was a giant in controversy, while he never sought it. A native tendency to despond somewhat shaded his public speech. His quick perception of prevalent wrong sometimes seemed to subdue his sense of the victory of faith. Yet not many were such 'sons of consolation' to timid, seeking souls. He was to the discouraged worker the prophet of a cheer which he too often withheld from himself. In conversations and by letters he was the guide of multitudes into the light of God's countenance. Having 'served his generation by the will of God,' he 'fell on sleep.'

(10.) RICHARD JOHN DAWSON; who was born at Bovain, in 1804. He was trained 'in the nurture and admonition of the Lord' by pious parents. His father was a Class-leader, brought him to the Class-meeting at an early age, and there he was deeply impressed. These impressions were deepened by a question put to him by his father. When fourteen years of age, he found peace at a lovefeast. In the year 1832 he entered the Primitive Wesleyan Conference Ministry, in the active work of which he continued for thirty-one years, his labours being earnest, painstaking and successful. He was the instrument of extensive revivals. His ministry was largely confined to mission stations, at that time presenting difficulties, toils and dangers little known now, but these he encountered with zeal, courage, and prayer such as rendered his work remunerative in the ingathering of souls.

His preaching was simple, plain and profitable. His prayers in public were pathetic, powerful and appropriate. He was regular in his visitation, and greatly appreciated in the homes of the people. He was known to walk upwards of twenty miles during drenching rain rather than disappoint the congregation. His character was blameless, and his consistency

uniform: guileless, unselfish, retiring, gentle, humble, godly and in sympathy with every good worker and work. He laboured as one to whom labour was rest, and life valuable, that he might go about 'doing good.' His love for Methodism was strong, his consecration to Christ manifest. At the close of his life, the prospect, as he said, was 'bright without a cloud.' He died rejoicing in hope of the glory of God, on the 8th of June, 1888, in the eighty-fourth year of his age, and the fifty-sixth of his ministry.

3. In our *Foreign Missions*, seven, viz.,—

(1.) ARTHUR HALL; who died at Belize, British Honduras, of yellow fever, on September 7th, 1887. His parents, soon after his birth, removed from Berkshire to Kensington. There in early youth he was brought under religious influence amongst the Methodists, and became a member of the Church. He was, for some time, engaged in evangelistic work at Bournemouth and Poole, and being approved as a candidate for the Ministry, was sent to the Richmond Branch of the Theological Institution. In May, 1886, he arrived at Belize, where, for about a year and four months, he laboured with diligence, devotion and success, bringing not a few souls to the Saviour, and being greatly beloved by all. He had prepared to preach on the 4th of September; but the call of the Master prevented. Amongst his last conscious utterances was: 'I am on the Rock.'

(2.) JOHN EDWARDS; who was born at Bridford, Devonshire, in 1804. He was converted to God in early life, and joined the Methodist Society. At the age of nineteen he became a Local-preacher, and in 1830 was received by the Conference as a probationer. After a year spent in an English Circuit he was ordained to the Ministry, prior to his being sent out as a missionary to South Africa, in 1832. For the next seven years he laboured in the interior, then a wild and almost unknown

region. The rest of his life was devoted chiefly to the work of colonial Circuits, in which he was remarkably successful. Port Elizabeth, Cradock, Somerset East and Graaff-Reinet Circuits were the result of his enterprise and zeal.

In 1876 he became a Supernumerary, and fixed his residence in Grahamstown. His toils and perils and successes are vividly described in his little book entitled *Reminiscences*, in which an account is given of *Fifty Years of Mission Life*.

He was a plain, earnest and most useful minister of Christ. His preaching was simple, pointed, evangelical and forcible in its appeals to the consciences of men. He often travelled great distances, kept his appointments with unfailing regularity, and was scrupulously exact and careful in all the duties of his vocation. As a pastor and visitor of the sick he was unsurpassed. His life was beautiful in its integrity, cheerfulness and devotion. By his friendly, loving spirit he gladdened the hearts of those whom he addressed, so that many grateful memories are cherished of both his sermons and his visits. The sick and the dying were the special objects of his sympathy and attention.

His last sermon was preached not many weeks before his death. The sufferings which he was called to endure were borne with great patience and resignation. His trust in God never failed. After weeks of almost constant pain, the end was calm and peaceful; and he entered the valley of the shadow of death without fear. He died at Grahamstown, on the 11th of November, 1887, in the eighty-fourth year of his age, and the fifty-eighth of his ministry.

(3.) GEORGE HALE GREEN. Of his early life, conversion and call to the Ministry little is known; but he was appointed to Grahamstown by the Conference of 1836, and arrived there with his devoted wife in 1837. During his two years' residence in that Circuit, a gracious and extensive revival of religion took place, the beneficial effects of which remained for a long period. He was largely instrumental in the erection of the first Church

built on the Frontier beyond Grahamstown, at Fort Beaufort. He subsequently laboured with great acceptance in various Circuits in the Eastern part of the Colony, being also appointed for a second and third time to Grahamstown. To the last he took a deep interest in the affairs of Methodism, and in the welfare of his brethren. His last station was Graaff-Reinet, where he became a Supernumerary in 1880.

He was a man of genial and generous spirit, beloved by his brethren, and by the people to whom he ministered. When in vigorous health he was an interesting, able and useful preacher. During his active ministry he was subject at times to much suffering, and for some time before his death his strength entirely failed. He never murmured nor betrayed impatience in his affliction, and when the end came he enjoyed perfect confidence and peace. He died at Graaff-Reinet, on the 31st December, 1887, in the seventy-seventh year of his age, and in the fifty-second of his ministry.

(4.) RICHARD HAYES ; who was born in Lincolnshire, in the year 1840. His parents were stanch members of the Methodist Connexion, and his grandmother was privileged to hear Wesley preach. He sought and found the Lord in early youth, and began to exercise his gifts as a Local-preacher when he was eighteen years of age. Being subsequently led to offer himself for the work of the Ministry, he was accepted, and after three years spent in the Theological Institution at Richmond, he was appointed to the South African Mission Field in the end of 1864. His first Circuit was Pietermaritzburg, Natal. After a three years' residence there he removed to Durban, where, as a colleague of that distinguished pioneer of Missions, the Rev. James Cameron, he spent four of the best years of his early ministerial life. He subsequently removed to Ladismith, and thence to important Native work in the Queenstown District, at Tsono. His last appointment was to Beaconsfield, on the Diamond Fields, at the Conference of 1884.

As the Chairman of the Kimberley and Bloemfontein District, he fulfilled the duties of the office with his accustomed diligence and fidelity.

Frequent and protracted attacks of fever told upon his usually vigorous constitution, and he had made arrangements to visit England with his family after an absence of twenty-four years. But Divine Providence ruled otherwise; and in place of a visit to the old land, he received the summons to his final reward. His wish, often expressed, was not to live after he was unable to work, but to go straight to rest, and in this he had his desire.

As a preacher he was thoughtful, earnest and effective, and as a pastor diligent and faithful. His piety was strong and thorough; and his sympathetic, generous nature won for him the esteem of all with whom he had to do. Perhaps no words could form a more fitting epitaph than those from which he discoursed with touching earnestness, in what proved to be his last sermon: 'At evening time it shall be light.'

He died at Beaconsfield, March 6th, 1888, in the forty-ninth year of his age, and the twenty-fourth of his ministry.

(5.) HENRY MAXWELL CAMERON, son of the late Rev. James Cameron (who for many years laboured with conspicuous ability and diligence in various parts of this country), was converted to God at Durban, in the colony of Natal, during the great revival which took place at the time of the Rev. William Taylor's visit, in the year 1866. Not long afterwards he began to preach, and in 1870 was received as a probationer for the Ministry.

He worked diligently and acceptably in various Circuits of the Natal District, and for some time had charge of the important Mission Station at Verulam. In 1884 he was appointed to the Superintendency of the Harrismith Circuit, in the Orange Free State, where his ministry was highly appreciated by all classes of the community.



From his youth he was upright and blameless in all the relationships of life. He was pleasant, though retiring, in social life; loyal to the Church of his choice; and beloved by the people, both English and Native, to whom he ministered. Possessing considerable mental power, and of studious habits, he attained to more than ordinary scholarship. His preaching was expository, evangelical and thoughtful; his style chaste and pure. During the latter years especially, he was greatly owned of God in the edification of the Church.

His last illness was sudden and brief, but during its most trying hours his soul was graciously sustained, and his vigorous faith caused him even in death to be 'more than conqueror.' He died at Harrismith, March 31st, 1888, in the thirty-eighth year of his age, and in the eighteenth of his ministry.

(6.) JOSHUA JORDAN; who was born in Ireland, about the year 1812. When a young man he emigrated to Trinidad, and for several years engaged in teaching. After his conversion he laboured for some time as a Local-preacher. In 1844 he was accepted as a candidate for the Ministry. He travelled in several Circuits in the West Indies, and for a few years laboured in Nova Scotia. In 1866 he was transferred to the Bahama District. About ten years since, circumstances rendered it necessary for him to retire from the active Ministry. He resided mostly in America until some months ago, when he returned to the Bahamas. In March last he undertook to supply a section of the Abaco Circuit. He then seemed to be in good health, and had no apprehension that the end was near. After a residence at Abaco of only five or six weeks, he was seized with illness which terminated fatally. On the 17th of April, 1888, he peacefully slept in Jesus, in the seventy-sixth year of his age, and the forty-fourth of his ministry. His last words were: 'All is well.'

(7.) CHARLES WHITE; who was born in Westminster, in 1816. While yet a child he went to South Africa with his

parents, and spent his youth in Grahamstown. Although converted early in life, and convinced that he ought to devote himself fully to the work of the Lord, circumstances did not favour his entrance into the Ministry until he was approaching middle age, in the year 1850.

He laboured with faithfulness and efficiency in several Native Circuits, and became a Supernumerary in 1883. His affection for the Native work was tender and strong. In every possible way he sought to evangelize and civilize the Native tribes to whom he was sent, and his success was manifested in the confidence and esteem which he won from the people. Sixteen years of his life were spent at Osborn, which, under his devoted and judicious administration, attained to great prosperity. Many were 'the crown of his rejoicing' during the period of his residence there, and many of his converts survive him.

During his last painful illness he manifested great cheerfulness; but his longings to depart, and 'be for ever with the Lord' were so strong that he frequently prayed that the Master would come quickly and take him unto Himself. The closing hours of his life gave abundant evidence of his triumphant trust in Christ. Not long before the end, his favourite verse was being quoted:

' Happy if with my latest breath  
I may but gasp His name;  
Preach Him to all——'

when he interrupted the speaker, and, with almost his last breath, exclaimed:

. . . . . 'and cry in death,  
" Behold, behold the Lamb ! "'

He died in great peace, during the sessions of the Conference, on the 24th April, 1888, in the seventy-third year of his age, and the thirty-eighth of his ministry.

WILLIAM T. COLE and JEREMIAH DALTON JOHNSON died since the last District Meeting. Their obituaries will appear next year.

Q. IX. How are our Ministers and Preachers on Trial STATIONED for the ensuing year?

A. As follows; viz. :—

[N.B. 1. Each of the places mentioned in these Stations, and numbered consecutively, from 1 to 906, is the head of the Circuit; and the Minister first named is the Superintendent.

2. The Superintendent and other Minister or Ministers, stationed in or appointed to the several Circuits undermentioned, is and are appointed by the Conference to preach and to perform all acts of religious worship and Methodist discipline, in each and every one of the Wesleyan-Methodist Chapels already erected, or to be erected, in each Circuit respectively, within the space of twelve calendar months, at such time or times, and in such manner, as to him or them shall seem proper; subject, nevertheless, to the Superintendent Minister.

3. The Minister appointed to any Station without a number is the Superintendent, and is therefore entitled to preside in the Quarterly Meeting and Trustees' Meeting; but he shall, as heretofore, act under the direction of the Chairman of the District.]

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#### EXAMINATIONS OF CANDIDATES FOR ORDINATION.

Q. XV. What are the Directions of the Conference respecting the THEOLOGICAL EXAMINATIONS OF CANDIDATES FOR ORDINATION?



A. 1. Before any Preacher, having travelled four years, is recommended by his District Meeting for admission into full Connexion, he shall undergo a careful examination by the Chairman of that Meeting, respecting his acquaintance with Mr. Wesley's Works in general, and especially with his Sermons and his *Notes on the New Testament*, in addition to the other examinations required by our existing Rules; and no Preacher shall be so recommended unless the result of his examination be satisfactory to the Meeting. (*Minutes*, vol. iv., p. 122.)

2. Arrangements shall be made for conducting the Theological Examination of Candidates for Ordination at a time when the President of the Conference can attend, and when a large proportion of the Conference, including its official members, may be expected to be present.

3. An explicit declaration by each Candidate of his belief of the doctrines of Methodism shall be substituted for the present Theological Examination.

#### EXAMINATION OF PREACHERS ON TRIAL.

Q. XVI. What is the Report upon the EXAMINATION OF PREACHERS ON TRIAL for the past year? And what are the directions of the Conference respecting the Examination of PREACHERS ON TRIAL for the ensuing year?

A. 1. The following is a summary of the Report upon the Examination of Preachers on Trial.

The Examination was held on April 10th and 11th. There was no case of failure in any Scripture subject in the Fourth Year, and consequently it was unnecessary to hold the Supplementary Examination prior to the District Meeting in May. The other Supplementary Examination was held in June according to the directions of the Conference.

All the Probationers were examined; but one, in consequence of special circumstances, took only two subjects.

At the June Examination five were re-examined in conse-

quence of failure in Scripture subjects; two who omitted the whole or a part of their subjects in April were examined; and four ex-Students were examined in accordance with the special regulations concerning them. (*Minutes*, 1887, p. 181, § 14.)

The general result of the examination of the Probationers of each year was as follows:—

**FIRST YEAR.**—28 probationers were examined, who wrote 112 papers, the valuation marks of which were as follows:—  
i+, 6; i, 26; ii+, 17; ii, 17; iii+, 20; iii, 12; iv+, 10; iv, 4.

**SECOND YEAR.**—42 probationers were examined, who wrote 207 papers, the valuation marks of which were as follows:—  
i+, 14; i, 23; ii+, 30; ii, 49; iii+, 42; iii, 21; iv+, 13; iv, 14; Failure, 1.

**THIRD YEAR.**—15 probationers were examined, who wrote 72 papers, the valuation marks of which were as follows:—  
i+, 4; i, 14; ii+, 9; ii, 16; iii+, 13; iii, 7; iv+, 7; iv, 1; Failure, 1.

**FOURTH YEAR.**—18 probationers were examined, who wrote 82 papers, the valuation marks of which were as follows:—  
i+, 2; i, 4; ii+, 15; ii, 23; iii+, 21; iii, 9; iv+, 5; iv, 3.

The average marks obtained by the examinees as compared with those of 1887 were as follows:—

**FIRST YEAR, 1887.**—Papers valued 3+, 19%; above 3+, 50%; below 3+, 32%. 1888.—Papers valued 3+, 18%; above 3+, 59%; below 3+, 23%.

**SECOND YEAR, 1887.**—Papers valued 3+, 17%; above 3+, 50%; below 3+, 33%. 1888.—Papers valued 3+, 20%; above 3+, 56%; below 3+, 24%.

**THIRD YEAR, 1887.**—Papers valued 3+, 28%; above 3+, 48%; below 3+, 24%. 1888.—Papers valued 3+, 18%; above 3+, 59%; below 3+, 22%.

**FOURTH YEAR, 1887.**—Papers valued 3+, 30%; above 3+, 48%; below 3+, 22%. 1888.—Papers valued 3+, 26%; above 3+, 54%; below 3+, 21%.

**HONOURS LIST.**—Last year out of 101 examinees only 28 obtained Honours. This year 42 are in Honours out of 103.

A place in the Honours List is assigned to those who take the full number of subjects required, and in other respects fulfil the conditions of the Examination as laid down in the *Minutes of Conference*, and who obtain an average mark not exceeding 2 for the subjects taken in the Examination. In the First Class are placed those whose average mark does not exceed 1. In the Second Class those who have an average of 2+. In the Third Class those who have an average between 2+ and 2. The names in each year stand in the order of merit; but, on account of the difference in subjects, no attempt is made to compare one year with another. The Honours List for this year is as follows:—

Four Ex-Students were examined according to the directions contained in the *Minutes* of 1887, p. 181, § 14. Because of the diversity of subjects, it is impossible to classify these with

the other examinees, or to compare them with one another. Of these only one received an average of 2, viz., J. A. Rothery. There was no case of failure.

2. (1) The Examination of Preachers on Trial shall be conducted by a Connexional Board of Examiners, to consist of one Examiner in each subject contained in the course of reading prescribed for the four years of probation.

(2) In addition to the Probationers' Examination Committee, two General Examination Secretaries shall be appointed.

(3) Arrangements shall be made at each Financial District Meeting for a Central Examination of Preachers on Trial in each District, or more than one if necessary; at which Central Examination or Examinations the Probationers in that District shall attend. In the event of any Preacher on Trial being unable to pay the necessary travelling expenses, those expenses shall be defrayed, together with other expenses of the Examination, from the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund and from the Theological Institution Fund, in such proportions as the Committees of those Funds may decide.

(4) At each Financial District Meeting a District Probationers' Examination Secretary shall be appointed, or more than one, so as to provide a Secretary to take charge of each Central Examination in the District; and each District Secretary shall be held responsible for the efficient conduct of the Central Examination. Full and clear instructions as to the course to be pursued are to be forwarded to the District Secretaries by the General Secretaries.

(5) The Examination shall be held in the Spring, on days to be fixed from year to year; and shall take place throughout the Connexion on the same days.

(6) The Examination-Papers, prepared under the direction of the Committee, shall be sent by the General Secretaries to each District Examination Secretary, whose duty it shall be to distribute them at the Central Examination, and by the earliest post transmit to the General Secretaries the Papers written by the several Probationers at those Examinations.

(7) The Probationers' Papers shall be forwarded by the General Secretaries to the Examiners for valuation, and each Examiner shall send to them the results of his valuation of the Papers shown by numbers, together with any remarks upon them which he may think desirable. In the case of the North and South Wales Districts, such variations from the foregoing arrangements are permitted as the Examination Secretaries may find necessary.

(8) The General Secretaries shall compile from the returns of the Examiners a complete Report upon the examination of each Probationer, and forward it to the District Examination Secretary, to be presented by him to the May District Meeting, together with such remarks on the Examination of the Preachers on Trial in the District as he may think desirable. The numbers obtained by each Preacher on Trial in the several subjects of Examination shall be entered on the District Minutes. The Resolutions of the District Meetings on the Examination of Preachers on Trial shall be forwarded to the General Secretaries by the District Examination Secretaries.

(9) The Conference directs the General Examination Secretaries to send to each District Committee—in May—having one or more Candidates for Ordination, a Report showing the result of the examination of every such Candidate during each year of his probation.

(10) The General Secretaries shall prepare and present to the Conference a General Report upon the Examination of the Preachers on Trial.

3. The following Ministers are appointed the Probationers' Examination Committee for the ensuing year; viz.,—the PRESIDENT of the Conference, the SECRETARY, the EX-PRESIDENT, the Tutors of the four Branches of the Theological Institution, the two General Examination Secretaries, the REV. 7. The Conference requires every Probationer who is acquainted with Greek and Hebrew to take the Greek and Hebrew subjects which are specified in the list of subjects for his year. Every Probationer who has been a student in the Theological Institution shall be examined in these Greek and Hebrew subjects, unless the Tutors under whom he studied, having taken into consideration his attainments on leaving the Institution, are of opinion that these examinations cannot reasonably be required in his case.

8. The Conference requires every Probationer of the second, third and fourth years respectively to be examined in four subjects; but it expects such Probationers to be examined, as a rule, in five subjects. Probationers of the first year shall be examined in four subjects. In all cases in which the full number of subjects is not taken, special attention shall be called to the fact in the report presented to the District Meeting.

9. Every Probationer of the second, third and fourth years respectively shall be examined in the subjects marked iv., v., and vi., in the list of subjects for his year. Every Probationer



of the first year shall be examined in the subjects marked iii., iv., and v., in the list of subjects for his year.

10. Whenever a Probationer obtains less than one-third of the full number of marks for a paper on any portion of Scripture, either in the original language or in English, he shall be re-examined in the same subject, and the results of both examinations shall be specially reported to the Conference. In the examinations on the Hebrew Bible and Greek Testament, questions on points of grammar shall form an essential part of every paper set.

11. In the case of Probationers of the fourth year, the second examination referred to in the last paragraph shall, if possible, take place early in May, in order that the District Meeting may be made acquainted with the result. In other cases the second examination shall, as a rule, be held in the latter part of June.

12. Every Probationer shall, not later than the end of October, 1888, inform Dr. Moulton what subjects he will present for Examination.

13. Every Probationer whom the President of the Conference shall send into the work before Christmas-day, 1888, shall be examined in the subjects of his year.

14. If any student be removed from the Theological Institution for Circuit work later than Christmas-day in any year, he shall not be expected to take the subjects prescribed for the examination of Probationers; but provision shall be made for his being examined, not later than June, in five subjects arranged by his Tutors and the General Examination Secretaries, in accordance with the course of study which he pursued before leaving the Institution. In every instance three of the subjects presented for examination shall be Books (or portions of Books) of Scripture. The result of this Examination shall be reported to the Conference, and shall be included in the special report required in the case of all candidates for ordination.

15. The days of Examination for the ensuing year shall be Wednesday and Thursday, April 10th and 11th, 1889.

16. Should any Probationer be prevented by illness, or otherwise, from attending the Annual Examination, the General Secretaries shall, in concert with the Chairman of the District in which he is stationed, make suitable provision for his examination.

17. The Conference sees no sufficient reason for the exemption of those brethren who have formerly been Ministers in other Churches from the usual course of reading and examination prescribed by the Conference for Preachers on Trial, and directs that they be required to observe such regulations.

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#### EXAMINATION OF CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY.

Q. XVII. What are the Directions of the Conference respecting the EXAMINATION OF CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY?

A. 1. (1) No Candidate for the Ministry shall be received

who does not possess a fair acquaintance with English Grammar, Orthography, Arithmetic, Geography and History.

(2) A preliminary Examination by papers, which shall be prepared each year by the Tutors of the several Branches of the Theological Institution in turn, shall be conducted by a Sub-Committee before the session of the District Committee, who shall value the answers of the Candidates; the report of their valuation to be sent to the District Committee concerned. This Sub-Committee shall be appointed by the Conference. The answers shall be written in the presence of the Superintendents of the Circuits by which the Candidates are recommended, or of one or more other Ministers.

The Sub-Committee for this year shall consist of the Rev. John G. Tasker, John Telford, B.A., Joseph T. L. Maggs, B.A., and Frederick W. Kellett, M.A.

(3) In order to secure, as far as practicable, uniformity of valuation, figures showing the number of marks obtainable by a complete answer shall be placed at the end of each question, and no Candidate shall be considered to have passed a satisfactory examination who does not gain one-fourth of the maximum number of marks allotted to the whole of the papers. No Candidate shall be excused from the preliminary examination on the ground that he has passed it in a former year.

(4) No Candidate who has failed to obtain the minimum number of marks in the preliminary Examination shall undergo the usual Examination by the District Committee unless, in the judgment of the Committee, he possesses such special gifts as to justify an exceptional procedure.

2. The Special Examination of Candidates for the Ministry, who have passed the District Committees, shall be conducted by a Committee in two Sections, having charge of Examinations to be held simultaneously at Richmond and Didsbury, respectively.

(i.) The two Sections of this Committee shall be constituted as follows:—

(1) THE SOUTHERN SECTION, to meet at Richmond, shall consist of the PRESIDENT, EX-PRESIDENT, and the SECRETARY of

the Conference; the Ex-Presidents resident in London; two of the Secretaries of the Missionary Society; the Tutors and Governors of the Richmond and Birmingham Branches of the Theological Institution; the General Treasurer of the Theological Institution; the Local Secretary of the Richmond Branch; one of the Secretaries of the Home-Mission Committee; one of the General Secretaries of the Examination Committee; the Rev. Peter Thompson, together with twelve other Ministers of the three London Districts, four of whom shall be elected by the District Committee of each of the said Districts in May.

(2) THE NORTHERN SECTION, to meet at Didsbury, shall consist of the Ex-Presidents living in the Manchester and adjoining Districts; two of the Secretaries of the Missionary Society; the Tutors and Governors of the Didsbury and Headingley Branches of the Theological Institution; the Local Secretary of the Didsbury Branch; one of the Secretaries of the Home-Mission Committee; one of the General Secretaries of the Examination Committee; the Rev. Enoch Salt, together with twenty-one Ministers of the Liverpool, Manchester, and Bolton Districts, seven of whom shall be elected by the District Committee of each of the said Districts in May.

(ii.) Two Sub-Committees, to read and report on the manuscript sermons of the Candidates, shall be annually appointed as follows:—one for the Southern Section, consisting of six Ministers, two of whom shall be chosen by the District Committee of each of the three London Districts from among the Ministers elected by it as members of the Examination Committee; and another for the Northern Section, consisting of six Ministers, two of whom shall be chosen by the District Committees of the Liverpool, Manchester, and Bolton Districts respectively, from among the Ministers elected by them as members of the Examination Committee.

(iii.) The Literary Paper for the Examination shall be prepared in succession by the Tutors in Biblical Literature and Exegesis of each of the four Branches of the Theological Institution; and the Theological Paper for the Examination shall be

prepared in succession by the Theological Tutors of the said four Branches.

(iv.) The Tutors in Biblical Literature and Exegesis of the Richmond and Birmingham Branches shall be the Literary Examiners for the Southern Section of the Committee; and the Tutors in Biblical Literature and Exegesis of the Didsbury and Headingley Branches shall be the Literary Examiners for the Northern Section of the Committee.

(v.) The Examiners of the Papers in Theology, written by the Candidates, shall be appointed as follows:—the First and Second London, the Liverpool, and the Manchester Districts shall each appoint one Examiner from among the Ministers elected by it as Members of the Examination Committee; thus providing two Examiners for each of its two Sections.

(vi.) The General Secretary of the Theological Institution, and the Rev. Charles H. Kelly are re-appointed General Secretaries of the Examination Committee. All communications relating to Candidates, and the Reports on their sermons heard after the District Committees, must be addressed to the Rev. Charles H. Kelly, *Spanish Close, Wandsworth Common, S.W.* The Ministers appointed to report on these sermons are requested *not* to fix marks of value.

(vii.) The Local Secretary of the Richmond Branch of the Theological Institution, and the Rev. Peter Thompson, are appointed to act as Examination Secretaries for the Southern Section; and the Local Secretary for the Didsbury Branch, and the Rev. Enoch Salt, to act as Examination Secretaries for the Northern Section.

3. When Candidates for the Ministry are recommended by the North or South Wales District Committee, the General Secretaries of the Examination Committee shall summon a Welsh Minister to attend the Northern or Southern Section of the Committee, who shall be a member of that Committee.

1. The respectful and hearty thanks of the Conference are due and are presented to its late PRESIDENT, the REV. JOHN WALTON, M.A., for his able, assiduous and successful discharge of the duties of his office, both during the sessions of the last Conference and throughout the year.

2. The best thanks of the Conference are presented to the REV. DAVID JAMES WALLER for his valuable services as Secretary of the Conference during the year.

3. The respectful thanks of the Conference are presented to the Ex-President, the REV. JOHN WALTON, M.A., for his able, impressive and eminently evangelical sermon preached in the Wesley Chapel, Camborne, on Sunday morning, July 29th.

4. The respectful thanks of the Conference are presented to the Ex-President, the REV. JOHN WALTON, M.A., for the very able, seasonable, valuable and practical Charge delivered to the newly-ordained Ministers at St. Mary's Chapel, Truro, on Thursday morning, August 2nd; and he is requested to publish it.

5. The cordial thanks of the Conference are presented to the REV. CHARLES HENRY KELLY, for his efficient services as Representative to the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church of the United States of America, held in May last, in the city of New York.

6. The thanks of the Conference are presented to the REV. FRANCIS W. GREEVES, the Convener of the Committee on Memorials and Suggestions, and he is re-appointed.

N.B.—The Convener is instructed to divide the District Suggestions into two lists, according to their subjects: (1) For the Pastoral Session, and (2) for the Representative Session, of

the Conference; and submit the lists to the President before they are entered in the Agenda.

THE REV. WILLIAM ARTHUR, M.A.—The Rev. William Arthur, M.A., having requested permission to become a Supernumerary, the Conference desires to convey to him the expression of its deep affection and respect, and to place upon record its sense of the great and varied services which he has rendered to Methodism and the Church at large during a ministry of fifty years. The Conference recalls with gratitude to God the blameless course of Mr. Arthur's life, and the gracious influence of his character and spirit; his unswerving attachment to Methodism, and powerful vindications of its doctrines and polity; and the many occasions on which he has strengthened his brethren by his counsel, and encouraged them by his example. Since the days when his first love and earliest labours were given to India, Mr. Arthur has been associated with our Missionary Society as a trusted adviser and wise administrator, whilst his advocacy of the cause of Missions has found recognition and borne fruit in many lands. Though often unable, for long periods of time together, to preach or speak in public, his sympathy and aid have been given to the work of God in many effectual ways. With special thankfulness would the Conference refer to the long series of literary labours by which Mr. Arthur has served the interests of true religion in this and other countries. Alike in the spheres of Church history, experimental religion and philosophy, Mr. Arthur has won for himself an honourable name, and contributed to the defence and confirmation of the Gospel. The Conference earnestly prays that Mr. Arthur's years may be prolonged, that they may be crowned with every blessing that ministers to peace and holiness, and that he may still be enabled to serve the cause of Christ, by the will of God, according to the measure of the gifts bestowed upon him.

THE REV. JOHN KILNER, D.D.—The retirement of the Rev.

John Kilner, D.D., affords the Conference an opportunity of placing on record its appreciation of his personal character and ability, and of the valuable and faithful service which he has rendered to the Connexion both at home and abroad. His brethren learn with sincere regret that he finds it necessary, in consequence of the state of his health, to retire from office as one of the General Secretaries of the Foreign Missionary Society. For nearly thirty years Dr. Kilner laboured with great success in Ceylon. He was largely instrumental in commencing and conducting successfully a scheme for the development of Native Agency in that island, and also in initiating plans for aggressive enterprise, assisted by the Society in proportion to the amounts provided locally, which have resulted in a large extension of the work of God. In the year 1876 Dr. Kilner was appointed one of the General Secretaries of the Missionary Society, and for twelve years he has alike by his public advocacy, financial skill and wise counsels, inspired by long and varied experience, contributed greatly to the Society's success, especially in District and Circuit administration. He paid a special visit to the missions in South Africa, and underwent severe toil and many hardships in prosecuting a mission of inspection and enquiry, the result of which is to be seen in the formation of the South African Methodist Churches into a separate Conference. For some time Dr. Kilner's health has not been vigorous, but at the Conference of 1887 it had somewhat improved, and there was reason to believe that it would admit of some years of continued service; and he was accordingly designated for a further term of office as one of the General Secretaries of the Society. Unhappily, the hopes then entertained have not been realized, and he has desired to be relieved from the toils and responsibilities of office. The Conference hereby records its high estimate of Dr. Kilner's personal character, its grateful appreciation of his varied and valued services, its affectionate sympathy with him in his personal and domestic afflictions, and its earnest prayers

that his life may be spared during many peaceful years to render such service as he may be able to the great cause to which he has devoted his life.

THE REV. RICHARD ROBERTS.—In granting the request of the Rev. Richard Roberts to be allowed to become a Supernumerary, the Conference takes the opportunity of placing on record its affectionate appreciation of his able and valued ministry during the past forty-three years. His genial spirit and the earnestness and impressiveness of his pulpit ministrations will be long and gratefully remembered, not only in the important Circuits to which he has been appointed, but also, in consequence of his 'labours more abundant,' throughout the Connexion. The Conference marked its sense of Mr. Roberts' character and services by electing him as its President in 1885, and the manner in which he fulfilled his onerous duties still further endeared him to his brethren. The name of Mr. Roberts will be placed amongst those of the honoured men on the Supernumerary list, but his brethren anticipate much valuable service at his hands, and they cherish the hope that he may long be spared to the Church which he loves, to exercise his popular and effective pulpit gifts for the benefit of the Connexion.

THE REV. WILLIAM JACKSON (A).—The Conference, in granting the request of the Rev. William Jackson (A) to become a Supernumerary, desires to record its sense of his services to the Connexion during a ministry of fifty-three years. For twenty-nine years Mr. Jackson shared the labours of the Itinerancy, occupying some of the most important Circuits in Methodism, and endearing himself to the people of his charge by the faithfulness and unction of his preaching, as well as by the untiring assiduity of his pastoral care. The ripe experience thus gained he has, for the last twenty-four years, placed at the service of successive generations of students, in his capacity as House Governor at Didsbury College, where his fidelity to every trust, his wise counsels and ready sympathy have been a power for good in

the formation of the character of many now in the ranks of our Ministry. His services as a preacher have been constantly in request over a wide area. The value of his judgment, and the Christian courtesy and business-like promptitude which have marked his dealings, added to his other qualities, have won for him a high place in the esteem and affection of his brethren. Its regret in his retiring is modified by the hope that, by God's blessing, he will be able still to serve the Church of his choice in the comparative rest which he has so honourably earned. His brethren trust the blessing of God may richly rest upon him in the eventide of life.

**CHURCH-MEMBERSHIP.**—The Report of the Committee is received. The Conference approves generally of the Report and of the principles included therein, and directs that it be remitted to the District Committees in **May**, when Ministers only are present, for their suggestions. The Committee is reappointed to consider such suggestions and to prepare a Report thereon for the next Conference.

This Committee is also directed (1) to consider the financial aspect of the Class Meeting, and (2) to enquire into the working and results of Junior Society-Classes.

**TRANSFER OF MEMBERS.**—The Conference is of opinion that in the case of the removal of a member of one of the Methodist Churches to a locality in which that Church is not

represented, it is advisable that arrangements should be made for the authorised transfer of such member to any other Methodist Church existing in the neighbourhood.

**LECTIONARY.**—The following Committee is appointed to prepare a Table of Lessons for Public Worship, and also, if deemed expedient, a plan for the consecutive reading of the Scriptures :—Rev. John A. Barrow-Clough, B.D., George Fletcher, Dr. Gregory, J. Robinson Gregory, Hugh Price Hughes, M.A., Dr. Osborn, Dr. Rigg, G. Stringer Rowe, Theophilus Woolmer, and W. Theophilus Davison, M.A., Convener.

**BUSINESS OF DISTRICT COMMITTEES.**—The following are appointed a Committee to revise the 'Order and Form of Business for District Committees':—The **PRESIDENT** and **SECRETARY** of the Conference, the Ex-President, Rev. Dr. Greeves, Theophilus Woolmer, and Marshall Hartley, Convener.

**WESLEY COLLEGE, SHEFFIELD.**—The Conference agrees to the following proposals of the Council of Wesley College, Sheffield :—(1) To abolish the form of government known as 'Dual Control'; (2) to appoint a resident Head Master with undivided authority; and (3) to appoint a non-resident Chaplain, who shall be the Pastor both of the College and of the College Chapel Congregation. The Pastor so appointed shall have absolute control of the pulpit, free access to the College for pastoral purposes, and the conduct of Bible and Society Classes apart from the College routine; and he shall be in no respect whatever under the control of the Head Master.

**COURSE OF READING FOR JUNIOR PREACHERS.**—The Conference receives the Report of the Committee appointed to prepare (1) a list of books suitable for the theological reading of Preachers on Trial; (2) a course of study for the guidance of Probationers for the Office of a Local-Preacher, and resolves :—

1. That a full and carefully classified list of Biblical and Theological works suitable for Junior Ministers and Local-Preachers be prepared; and also,

2. A second and briefer list, suitable for Candidates for the Office of a Local-Preacher, and for Local Preachers whose time is for reading limited.

3. That supplements to these lists be prepared and issued from time to time.

CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY.—The Conference resolves: 1. That Candidates for the Ministry from the Welsh Districts who are able to preach in English, and who pass their examinations in English, shall be regarded as eligible for the general work.

2. The following Committee is appointed to consider the probable number of accepted Candidates required at the next Conference: the PRESIDENT and SECRETARY of the Conference; the Ex-President; Rev. W. Theophilus Davison, M.A., Walford Green, Charles H. Kelly, George W. Olver, B.A., Dr. Rigg, T. Tapley Short, M.A., William J. Tweddle, and J. Ernest Clapham, Convener.

SYSTEM OF MARKING IN EXAMINATIONS.—The Conference resolves:—(1) that in future, in valuing all Examinations and Trial Sermons, a system of marks by numbers from 1 to 7 be adopted: number 1 being the highest value and 7 the lowest; (2) that the seven grades from 1 to 7 shall signify respectively *excellent, very good, good, fair, moderate, poor, very poor*; and that the marks 1, 2, 3, denote three grades of an Honours' Division; and 4, 5, 6, 7, four grades in a Pass Division; 'average' quality being indicated by the mark 4 (*fair*); (3) that this system of marking be printed on all suitable occasions.

STATIONING COMMITTEE.—The Conference receives the Report of the Committee appointed last year to consider the time and place of the meeting of the Stationing Committee, and resolves, That in future the meeting of the Stationing Committee preparatory to the Conference shall be held in London. (*For other information relating to this matter see STANDING ORDER 46, page 316*).



STATUS OF CERTAIN MINISTERS.—The Conference resolves :—

1. That any Minister wishing to maintain his ministerial status whilst holding no definite appointment to a Circuit or a Department, and without becoming a Supernumerary, shall apply for permission through the District Meeting to the Conference, which shall decide the case after a full examination of it by a special committee.

2. That any such Minister shall continue to be in every way subject to our discipline, including the usual enquiries as to character and doctrine.

3. That no such Minister shall receive any payment from the Auxiliary Fund during, or on account of, the years in which he shall occupy the position herein described, and that he shall pay the yearly assessment to the Children's and Schools Funds, on the same scale as Ministers appointed to Departments, and that he shall then continue to receive the benefit of those Funds in the ordinary course.

4. That the name of every such Minister shall stand upon the *Minutes* in connection with some Circuit, and following his name shall be these words: 'Resides in this Circuit without Pastoral charge.' Nevertheless, he shall not, as a Minister, be a member of the Quarterly Meeting or of any Leaders' Meeting in the Circuit.

SUPERNUMERARIES RESIDENT ABROAD.—The Conference resolves :—

1. That any Minister having permission to reside abroad shall have such permission annually renewed.

2. If any Minister remain abroad for more than one year he shall be required either to make some arrangements with the officers of our Connexional Funds, with a view to retiring from the English work, or to furnish the Conference annually with a satisfactory report from some other Methodist Conference, in recognised relation with this Conference.

3. A list of all such Ministers shall be annually printed in the *Minutes of Conference* at the end of the Stations.

COMMITTEE OF PRIVILEGES.

Q. XXIV. What are the COMMITTEES FOR GUARDING OUR PRIVILEGES during the ensuing year ?

A. 1. The ORDINARY COMMITTEE, which shall have full power to take action in all cases affecting our Connexional or public interests, unless in its judgment, or in the judgment of the President of the Conference, it is deemed expedient to refer any case to the Extraordinary Committee named below.

The Ordinary Committee shall meet whenever it is convened either by direction of the President of the Conference, or by its Secretaries, and shall consist of :—

The REV. T. TAPLEY SHORT, M.A., is appointed the Secretary, and MR. ROBERT W. PERKS is re-appointed Secretary to this Committee.

3. The thanks of the Conference are presented to the REV. FRANCIS W. GREEVES for his services during several years as Ministerial Secretary of the Committee of Privileges.

4. The Conference refers back to the Committee of Privileges the question of the introduction into Parliament of a Bill to relieve Nonconformists from the presence of the Registrar at Marriages celebrated in their places of worship, with instructions to reconsider the whole question, and to act accordingly.

5. The Committee is further authorised to secure the introduction of a Bill to enable Nonconformists to secure sites for places of worship where such sites cannot be obtained otherwise than by the exercise of compulsory powers; and also to present petitions to Parliament in favour of any such measure, subject to such alterations and amendments in the Bill as the Committee may deem necessary.

6. The Conference approves of the principle that all needful facilities should be given for the compulsory enfranchisement of chapels erected on leasehold sites, and directs the Committee to give their attention to this subject in connection with any measure which may come before Parliament.

7. The Committee is further directed to take the necessary steps to secure an alteration of the 'Burial Laws Amendment Act, 1880,' by which the length of the necessary notice of intention to bury may be reduced, if possible, to twelve hours.

8. The Conference authorises the Committee to take steps to secure such an amendment in the law, or in the administration thereof, as shall secure, within reasonable limits, the

uninterrupted right of preaching in public thoroughfares and open spaces.

9. The Conference directs the Committee to consider during the year the electoral disadvantages to which Wesleyan-Methodist Ministers are subject in consequence of the Itinerancy, and to take such action as may be advisable, in order to these disadvantages being removed.

10. The Committee is authorised to confer with the representatives of other Nonconformist Churches in any matter coming within the province of the Committee, in which common action may be deemed advantageous.

5. The Conference adopts the Resolutions of the Committee on the suggestions referred to the Committee by the Conference of 1887:—

(1) That in every Circuit where separate Committees for the several Local Branches are not otherwise appointed, such separate Committees or a General Circuit Committee shall be annually appointed by the December Quarterly Meeting.

(2) That the accounts of every branch shall be closed not later than January 31st in each year, and audited during the first week in February by auditors to be appointed by the preceding December Quarterly Meeting, and that from the accounts so audited the usual schedule shall be prepared and immediately forwarded to the District Treasurer.

(3) That each Branch Committee shall be responsible for securing the audit of its own accounts, and that the Secretary of the Circuit Committee shall be responsible for filling up and forwarding the Circuit Schedule. Where no Circuit Committee exists, a Secretary shall be appointed for the purpose by the preceding December Quarterly Meeting.

(4) That the accounts of the several Branches as thus audited shall be reported to the March Quarterly Meeting.

6. The Conference directs (i) that a special meeting of the Missionary Sub-Committee in every District shall be held as soon as possible after the September Financial District Meetings, and that at each of these meetings an Officer or other Representative of the General Committee shall be present with a view to consultation as to the best means of promoting the interests of Foreign Missions in the District. (ii) That in

consultation with the District Sub-Committees, arrangements shall be made for Central or Circuit Meetings of Committees, collectors, and friends ;—these Meetings also to be attended by an Officer or other Representative of the Committee, and for purposes similar to those before mentioned. And (iii) that efforts be made in connection with these meetings to secure a more effective canvass of the congregations by collectors for Missions only; and also the more vigorous working of Juvenile Associations. The Conference, however, would deprecate any movement tending, by means of Juvenile Associations, to supersede the work of those who collect for Foreign Missions only.

7. The Conference hereby designates, as the Committee's Representative in France, so far as the affairs of the French Conference are concerned, the Rev. Dr. Cornforth; who will obtain and give to the Committee all such information concerning the work under the care of the French Conference, and at such times and in such manner as the Committee may, from time to time, request.

6. The Conference directs that the April Meetings of the General Committee and of the Governing Bodies be held at

Bath, that the October Meetings be held in Manchester, and that the January and July Meetings be held in London.

7. The Conference, having received the report of the General Committee, resolves

(i.) That, while the circumstances of the Fund for the Maintenance and Education of Ministers' Children do not at present admit of any decrease in the amount of the Assessments, the Conference believes, from the figures put before it, that there is every prospect at the end of the second five-yearly period, of such a diminution in the charge as will admit of some considerable reductions.

(ii.) That, inasmuch as the pressure upon the Schools Fund will have so moderated as to change all the circumstances at the end of the second five-yearly period (1894), a portion of the £10,000 to be provided during the seven years according to the calculations detailed in the Report of the General Committee (par. 61), may be left to be defrayed out of the balances of the next ensuing period.

(iii.) That, under the present circumstances of the Connexion, the Conference does not direct any increase of the Assessments for the Maintenance and Education of Ministers' Children.

(iv.) That the Ministerial Subscriptions and Circuit Assessments be continued, and that the payment by Ministers in Circuit work, having children at the schools, of £2 for each child at school shall be, as heretofore, in addition to the subscription of one guinea; but that Ministers received into Full Connexion with the Conference, yet not provided with houses, shall, in this matter, be treated as Preachers on trial, subscribing half-a-guinea per annum to the Fund.

(v.) That, from the Conference of 1889, that part of the Common Fund which is for Education shall be made self-adjusting upon the lines already adopted in respect of Maintenance; the charge in this respect upon each Circuit calling out an additional Minister being £2 per annum during the period of probation, and £4 per annum afterwards; making a total assessment in such cases of £10 15s. and £21 10s. respectively.

(vi.) That the modifying provision to the Assessment Scheme (*Minutes*, 1887, p. 202), shall be rescinded.

(vii.) That, as it appears that the expenditure of the Schools Fund will exceed its present income during the next seven years by about £10,000 in the gross, the Conference directs an increase of half-a-guinea each in the subscriptions of Ministers; the amount of such subscriptions being divided among the Districts, according to the number of Ministers in each; and the amount due from each District being allotted among the Ministers by the District Meeting when composed of Ministers only.

#### 8. ADMISSION TO THE SCHOOLS.

(1) *On the Foundation.* The number of boys for whom provision is made is two hundred and fifty.

(2) *On Payment.* In addition to the 250 admitted on the Foundation, fifty boys are received annually on payment. In the case of boys who have neither received Education allowance nor been at the School, the charge is £25. Parents whose boys are thus received will be entitled, for that year, to the usual allowances from the Children's Fund, and twelve pounds for Education.

*Extra Years.* The Rule as to extra years shall be construed in harmony with Clause twenty-one of the Scheme of Management of the Kingswood School, and with Clause nineteen of the Scheme of Management of the Queenswood and Trinity Hall Schools. In every case where an extra year, at the end, is granted to any boy or girl, the sum of £30 shall be paid. Parents whose children are granted an extra year are entitled to the six guineas from the Children's Fund, and, unless they have already received for six years, the twelve pounds for Education.

*Special Resolution on Extra Years.* In the case of boys who come very near to winning Scholarships, an extra year shall be granted on the payment of £25, if the parents desire it, subject to the recommendation of the Governor and Headmaster. This

Regulation shall be made retrospective, so as to secure the return after Midsummer of three boys specially reported to the Governing Body.

9. APPLICATION FOR ADMISSION. Not later than the 1st of March, the name and age of every applicant for admission must be sent, in the case of boys, to the REV. JOHN S. SIMON, 32, *Albemarle Crescent, Scarborough*; and, in the case of girls, to the REV. RALPH M. SPOOR, 59, *Upper Brook Street, Manchester*. The boys must be not less than ten, and girls not less than twelve, years of age at the next Midsummer.

#### 10. EXAMINATIONS FOR ENTRANCE.

*Standard IV.* Candidates ten years of age. Reading—A few lines of poetry to be read intelligently. Writing from Dictation—A short passage from an easy Reading-Book. Arithmetic—The First Four Rules, Simple and Compound (Money only). Grammar—The Parts of Speech. Parsing a simple sentence. Geography—Outlines of Geography of England and Wales. History—Elementary knowledge of the main facts of English History. Scripture—Main facts of Scripture History, as contained in Appendix to Catechism, Part I.

*Standard V.* Candidates eleven years of age. Reading—Intelligent reading of a more difficult passage. Dictation—Short passages from an easy author. Arithmetic—The First Four Rules, Simple and Compound (Money and Weights and Measures) and Practice. Grammar—Elementary work. Parsing simple sentences. Geography—Outlines of Geography of Great Britain and the Colonies. History—Outlines of History of England. Scripture—Main facts of Scripture History.

*Standard VI.* Candidates twelve years of age. Reading and Dictation—As above for Standard V., but more advanced. Arithmetic—As Standard V., with Elementary Vulgar Fractions. Grammar—Analysis and Parsing of simple sentences.

Geography—Outlines of Geography of Europe (including British Isles). History—Outlines of History of England. Scripture—Main facts of Scripture History.

11. NOTICE OF REMOVAL FROM SCHOOL.—The Conference directs that, in order to avoid any unnecessary disturbance of arrangements made for the teaching and general management of the Schools, and in order to give the Governing Bodies sufficient time to make an equitable selection of candidates for any vacancies which may occur during the year, parents having children at the Schools shall be required to give three months' notice before the removal of such child or children.

12. WOODHOUSE-GROVE SCHOOL, LIMITED.—The Conference directs that for Ministers' sons, being claimants on the Fund, the fee at Woodhouse-Grove School for the year 1888-9 be £21.

13. EDUCATIONAL ALLOWANCES FOR CHILDREN NOT AT THE SCHOOLS.—Payments are made at the Conference for the past year; and in every case in which the Educational Allowance has been received by the parent, the claim upon the Schools Fund shall be understood to have been met and satisfied for that year. Parents may begin to claim for their children when they are nine, ten, eleven, or twelve years of age, at the preceding Christmas Day; but no claim for the first year can be allowed after a child is twelve years old,—and having once begun to claim, they shall receive their payments annually.

14. CIRCUIT SCHEDULES.—Not later than the 1st of March, each Superintendent shall send to the REV. R. WALLIS BOYNS, *The Manse, Chislehurst*, a particular account of all claims for Educational Allowances in his Circuit; specifying distinctly the names of the children for whose education the claims are made, together with the date, year, and place of their birth, and the exact number of years during which the allowance has been received.

15. CHANGES IN THE EX-OFFICIO MEMBERSHIP OF THE

GOVERNING BODIES.—The Conference again expresses its approval of the changes which were effected by the Conference of 1887, in the *ex-officio* membership of the Governing Bodies of Kingswood and of the Queenswood and Trinity Hall Schools. They are as follows:—

(1) The Treasurership of the Governing Body of Kingswood School has been abolished, inasmuch as, for some years past, no duties have attached to the office.

(2) The Secretary of the Cash Office, being an officer of the Funds, has been appointed an *ex-officio* member of the General Committee, and of the two Governing Bodies respectively, as well as of the Finance Sub-Committee.

16. The Conference directs that, in order to bring the Scheme of the Governing Body of the Schools for Girls into harmony with the General Scheme for Connexional Committees, Paragraph 5 be amended thus:—

From the Governing Body of the Girls' Schools, and as Sub-Committees thereof, a Managing Committee, consisting of sixteen members, shall be appointed for each of the Girls' Schools, viz. :—

(i.) Two Treasurers (a Minister and a Layman), and one Local Secretary (a Minister);

(ii.) Five Ministers and five Laymen, who shall be members of the Governing Body; and

(iii.) The Treasurers and Secretary of the other Local Executive Committee;

With the members of each Managing Committee thus appointed by the Conference there shall be associated as additional members other persons who shall not be members of the Governing Bodies unless they have been appointed to it by the Conference. The additional members of the Managing Committees shall be appointed by the General Committee upon the nomination of each Committee.

(iv.) Part I., Section 2, Sub-section v. (p. 13), the number 18 shall be altered to 20.

17. SCHOLARSHIPS AT QUEENSWOOD.—The Conference gratefully recognises the generosity of the Board of Trustees of the Fernley Trust, and of the Gibson Memorial Fund Committee, in providing funds for the proposed Scholarships for Queenswood School, and directs that the following scheme be printed in the *Minutes*:

*Scheme for the Management of the Fernley and Susannah Gibson Scholarships.*—(1) The Scholarships shall be of the value of £30 and £25 per annum respectively.

(2) The first Scholarship shall be called the 'Fernley Scholarship,' and the second the 'Susannah Gibson Scholarship.'

(3) The amounts shall be paid annually to the Local Treasurers of the Queenswood Managing Committee.

The rate of payment for each girl who receives an extra year shall be the amount fixed by the Conference from year to year; and the parents or guardians of the girls holding the Scholarships shall be required to pay the difference between the amount of the Scholarship held by them respectively, and the amount so fixed by the Conference. The rate now is £30.

(4) The Scholarships shall be open to all girls who are in their last year at Queenswood.

(5) The Scholarships shall be awarded annually by the Local Executive Committee. In awarding the Scholarships, the Committee shall take into consideration:

(a) The age and the moral character of the candidates, as reported by the Lady Principal.

(b) The register of school marks for the year.

(c) The position in the Cambridge Local Examination (senior or junior), or in the First Division of the Second Class, or in a higher class of the College of Preceptors' Examination, one of which examinations the candidate must have passed.

(d) The results of the School Examination in June, now conducted by the Syndicate of Cambridge.

(6) The names of the Scholars shall be notified from year to year in the Schools Fund Report.

(7) In the event of the death or withdrawal of any girl



while holding a Scholarship, the payment on behalf of the girl shall cease at the end of the Quarter then current.

(8) Power shall be reserved to the Local Executive Committee to revise, alter, or add to this scheme from time to time; subject however to the approval of the Governing Body of the Schools for Girls.

18. The Conference places on record its sense of the great loss which it has suffered in the death of the Rev. John Harvard, who had been an officer of the Schools Fund from the year 1856; and who, throughout his thirty-two years of service, commanded the affectionate respect of all associated with him.

19. The thanks of the Conference are presented to the Officers of the Schools Fund, the General Committee, the Governing Bodies, with their Treasurers and Secretaries, and to the Managing Committees, for the diligent and faithful discharge of the duties of their respective offices during the year; also to Mr. J. Hartley Blackburn, of Bradford, for his valuable services as Honorary Auditor of Kingswood School Accounts.

20. The Conference directs that the application and enforcement of the rule respecting the clothing of the sons of necessitous Supernumeraries or Widows at Kingswood School be left to the discretion of the General Committee. (*Minutes*, 1882, p. 240.)

21. All Collections, Subscriptions, and Circuit Assessments on behalf of the Schools Fund are to be sent to the REV. WALFORD GREEN, *Centenary Hall, Bishopsgate Street Within, London, E.C.*

22. All payments for children at the Schools, whether £25 for first year or £30 for extra year, are due in four equal instalments, one on each quarter day; and the money must be sent to the REV. WALFORD GREEN, *Centenary Hall, Bishopsgate Street Within, London, E.C.*

## CHAPEL AFFAIRS.

Q. XXVII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference with regard to CHAPEL AFFAIRS?

A. 1. The Conference receives and adopts the Report of the Wesleyan Chapel Committee.

2. The Conference authorises the President, during the year, to affix his signature to any consent to the sale of Trust Property which may be certified to him as approved by the Chapel Committee.

3. The Conference rescinds the resolution adopted in 1887 (*Minutes*, pp. 216, 217), "On no account shall Village Chapels or other Trust Property be sold, or otherwise alienated from Methodist Purposes;" and instead resolves as follows:— Before consent is given to the Sale of any Village Chapel not to be superseded by a new erection, the opinion of the Home Mission Committee shall be obtained as to the desirability of retaining the property.

4. Irregular Chapel Cases. The Report was presented, and received by the Conference.

The Conference directs that the Chapel Committee send the particulars of all these cases to the several District Meetings; so that enquiry may be made from time to time, until it shall appear that the conditions of erection or enlargement have been complied with. The Conference further directs the Chapel Committee to call the special attention of the District Meetings to certain cases in which the proportion of debt is excessively heavy, or the proceedings wholly irregular, and that the judgment of the District Committees in these cases should be communicated to the Trustees through the Superintendents.

5. Mr. WILLIAM TUNSTALL, of Nelson, and Mr. JOHN COOPER, of Manchester, are re-appointed Treasurers of the General Chapel Fund.

6. The Rev. HENRY J. POPE is the General Secretary of the Chapel Committee.

7. The Committee for the next year shall consist of the Rev. JOSEPH BUSH, President of the Conference; Rev. DAVID J. WALLER, Secretary of the Conference; Rev. WORN-OUT MINISTERS' AND MINISTERS' WIDOWS'  
AUXILIARY FUND.

Q. XXIX. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the affairs of the AUXILIARY FUND ?

A. 1. The Conference receives and adopts the Report of the Committee.

2. The Conference regrets to learn that while the charges upon the Fund have largely increased, and are likely to continue to increase, there has been no corresponding increase in the ordinary income. The balance owing to the Treasurers is £1,574 4s. 0d.

3. The Conference deeply regrets that, owing to the state of the Fund, the Committee has been unable to vote in full the Grants to cases of affliction, some of which are painfully distressing, as recommended by the District Committees.

4. The Conference regrets to find that in many Circuits the public collections are largely, and in some cases wholly, taken to supplement the Class contributions; and recommends that, by a conscientious mention of the subject in the Classes by the Ministers, an effort be made to raise the quota of sixpence per member, so that the public collections may go to the direct augmentation of the Fund.

5. In view of the constantly increasing claims upon this Fund, the Conference urges upon the Ministers to make careful and earnest exertions to maintain and augment the annual income by private subscriptions; and also kindly to bring the claims of the Fund before the Trustees of our Chapels.

6. The Conference resolves that the scale of allowances to Ministers' Widows shall be, for this year, fourteen pounds, in addition to ten shillings per annum for each year that the husband travelled.

7. The hearty thanks of the Conference are presented to those friends who during the past year have generously aided this Fund by special donations; to those Executors who have

paid sundry legacies; to those Trustees who have contributed to the Fund from their Chapel-income; also to the District and Circuit Treasurers for their valuable services.

8. The cordial thanks of the Conference are presented to the Rev. Walford Green and Mr. John Napier, for their services during the past year.

11. The Conference directs that the following resolutions previously adopted shall be reprinted:—

(1) The Conference resolves that, wherever it is practicable, two Collections shall be made annually in each Chapel throughout the Connexion on behalf of the Funds of the Theological Institution; and that these Collections shall be made, if possible, on some Sunday in December. And it directs the Superintendents of Circuits to remit all subscriptions and collections for the Theological Institution to the General Treasurers early in the year; and the Chairmen of Districts to ascertain, by enquiry at the May District Meeting, whether such payments have been made.

(2) The Conference affirms the principle, which has from the beginning been recognised in the administration of the Institution, in regard to charges on account of Students, that such Students as have the means, or whose friends have the means, shall be expected to contribute, in whole or in part, according to their ability, towards the cost of their own maintenance and education; and it directs the General Committee to consider



and adopt such methods as may be deemed best for carrying this rule into effect.

(3) The Conference resolves that a minimum charge for maintenance shall be made, which every Student shall be expected to defray ; it being, however, distinctly understood that the General Committee shall be empowered to remit the charge wherever, and in so far as it may be found on enquiry that any Student is unable to pay. And further, that all who are able, either themselves or by their parents or friends, to add to the payment for *maintenance*, payment on account of *education*, should be urged to do so.

12. The Conference resolves (1) that it is not expedient to reduce the number of Ministers employed on the Staff at any of the Branches of the Institution ; (2) that one Member of the Staff shall have Pastoral charge of the Students, and be the Governor of the Institution House ; (3) that the Minister having such charge shall also discharge the functions of a Tutor ; (4) that the subjects assigned to him shall be the duties of the Pastoral Office and Church Organization, especially in relation to Wesleyan Methodism ; (5) that the designation of such Minister shall stand in the *Minutes of Conference* thus : 'A— B—, Pastoral Theology and Church Organization,' and that after the designation of the Tutors be inserted 'N.B.— A— B— shall have Pastoral charge of the Students, and be the Governor of the Institution House.'

Q. XXXI. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of WESLEYAN EDUCATION ?

A. 1. The Conference receives the Report of the proceedings of the Education Committee during the year, together with a Statistical Statement relating to Training Colleges, Day Schools, Sunday Schools, and the Connexional Sunday-School Union,

and directs that an Abstract thereof be printed in the *Minutes*. (See Appendix, No. III.)

6. The Committee shall act as a Sub-Committee of the Education Committee, and shall report to and through that Committee.

7. The Committee is empowered to make appropriations by way of grant or loan, or otherwise, on account of the remainder of the sum of Ten Thousand Pounds, which was allotted from the Thanksgiving Fund in aid of Methodist Middle-Class Schools.

8. 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#### THE CHILDREN'S HOME AND ORPHANAGE.

Q. XXXII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of the CHILDREN'S HOME AND ORPHANAGE?

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#### RELIGIOUS OBSERVANCE OF THE LORD'S DAY.

Q. XXXIII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on receiving the Report of the Committee for Promoting the RELIGIOUS OBSERVANCE OF THE LORD'S DAY?

A. 1. The Conference adopts the Report, and re-affirms its steadfast belief in the Divine authority and perpetual obligation of the Sabbath or Lord's Day, and its conviction of the necessity that all effectual defence and assertion of the Lord's Day Rest must be on that basis.

2. The Conference regards with unabated concern the attempts which are still in progress in Parliament and elsewhere, for encouraging the desecration of the Lord's Day; and most earnestly recommends the whole body of Wesleyan Ministers, Sunday School Teachers, and people, in conjunction with the Sabbath Committee, to persevere in employing their

utmost efforts and influence, sustained by their example, to counteract such attempts; and to connect with the employment of all such influence and effort earnest prayer to God for His guidance and blessing, until the right observance of that day shall be universally established.

The Conference renews its recommendation that on one day in the year attention shall be called in all our pulpits to the duty of sacredly observing the Sabbath Day.

## EXTENSION OF METHODISM IN GREAT BRITAIN.

## TEMPERANCE.

Q. XXXVI. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of TEMPERANCE ?

1. The Conference receives and adopts the Report of the Temperance Committee, and directs that an Abstract be printed in the Minutes. (See Appendix, No. V.)

2. The Conference hears with great satisfaction of the continuous growth of Wesleyan-Methodist Bands of Hope, which now number 8,344 Bands, and 339,065 enrolled members.

3. The Conference is gratified to learn that the Adult Temperance Societies show the substantial increase on the year of 5,302 members, and commends this important branch of our work to the attention and care of our people.

4. The Conference reiterates its deep regret that no Bill has yet been passed to secure the Sunday Closing of Public-Houses in England, and urges the Methodist people to continue their exertions until this object is reached.

5. The Conference recommends that on the last Sunday in November in each year, special reference shall be made in all Wesleyan-Methodist places of worship, and in all our Sunday-Schools, to the appalling extent and dire results of Intemperance in Great Britain.

6. The Conference approves the Resolution of the Temperance Committee, based upon the suggestion of several important Districts, that, in the interests of Temperance work in the country, a Minister should be set apart as Connexional Organising Secretary, and specially remits the question to the District Committees in May, when laymen are present; and requests the Pastoral Session of the Conference of 1889, if a majority of the District Meetings report in favour of the proposal, to appoint a Minister to this office, provided the Temperance Committee shall make provision for all financial obligations involved in the appointment.

THE LATE SIR WILLIAM M'ARTHUR, K.C.M.G.—The Conference regards with deep sorrow the sudden and lamented death of Sir William M'Arthur, K.C.M.G.

It bows with reverent submission to the Divine decree which has at a most anxious period deprived the Missionary Society of one of its most trusted, beloved and honoured officers; and humbly looks to Almighty God for direction and guidance in the future conduct of the Society's affairs.

In the death of Sir William M'Arthur the Conference and

the Missionary Society has sustained a loss which it will be very difficult to repair; but the Conference hopes and prays that the Great Head of the Church, Who so abundantly endowed him, will raise up others who shall be similarly enriched, and upon whom his mantle shall rest.

Sir William M'Arthur was a man of broad views, of wide and generous sympathies, of large-hearted and open-handed benevolence, of deep and simple piety, and by these characteristics he was distinguished in his official capacity as the Treasurer of the Missionary Society. He served the Society zealously and effectively in the councils of the Committee Room, on the platforms of public meetings, and by the exercise of his extensive personal influence, both in private circles and for many years in the House of Commons, as occasion required and opportunities were afforded. At the time of his death he was, with characteristic enterprise and energy, engaged in the promotion of a scheme which he believed would greatly advance the Society's interests and at the same time confer substantial and lasting benefits upon every department of Methodism and upon the Connexion generally.

The Conference places on record its high estimate of Sir William M'Arthur's personal character, and its grateful appreciation of his distinguished services.

THE LATE MR. JAMES BARLOW, J.P.—The Conference desires to place on record its sense of the high Christian character and distinguished liberality of the late Mr. James Barlow, J.P., one of the General Treasurers of the Children's Home, and cordially endorses the following resolution of the General Committee, passed shortly after his death:—  
'This Committee cannot proceed with its ordinary business without placing on record its sense of the very great loss it has sustained by the sudden death of Mr. James Barlow, one of the General Treasurers. As a true friend, an influential citizen, a large employer of labour, a consistent Methodist, and a Christian man deeply interested in the cause of Christ through-

out the world, Mr. Barlow had many claims upon their respect and affection. But his relation to this department of the work of God was very intimate and special. He was one of the earliest friends of the movement, and his gift of the Edgworth Estate, with subsequent benefactions, did much to give the entire movement an enlarged scope, and a solidity and permanence it could not otherwise have so soon attained. To the last Mr. Barlow took the deepest personal interest in everything connected with the entire enterprise, and especially with the Lancashire Branch. His visits to it were frequent. He was a welcome guest in every house, and the children particularly clung round him and looked upon him as a dear and honoured friend. The loss of his presence, his wise advice, his sympathetic interest, and his generous help will be long and severely felt. The Committee bows in submission to the mysterious Providence which has so suddenly removed their honoured friend, and beg to assure Mrs. Barlow and the other members of the family of their deep and prayerful sympathy.'

OFFICE OF THE THEOLOGICAL INSTITUTION, SCHOOLS, CHILDREN'S, AND AUXILIARY FUNDS.—The Conference adopts the Report, and re-appoints the Committee. (See Appendix, VII.)

2. The following are the Committee :—The Home-Mission Sub-Committees of the three London Districts; the Chairmen and Financial Secretaries of the Bedford and Northampton, the Kent, and the Norwich and Lynn Districts; and the Rev. John Bond, Convener.

**ENGLISH PREACHING IN NORTH WALES.**—The Conference resolves :—

1. The Committee for next year shall be constituted as follows :—The Chairmen of the North Wales, South Wales, and Liverpool Districts; four persons to be elected by the North Wales District, and four by the Liverpool District, at the Financial District Meetings in September; two persons to be appointed by the Home-Mission Committee; and the Rev. John W. Greeves, Convener.

2. The Committee shall meet only when a request that it may be called together has been received from any two Members of the Committee, and who have signified to the Convener the special business which they desire to be considered.

**METHODISM IN SOUTH WALES.**—1. The Conference receives and adopts the Report of the Committee.

2. The following Special Committee is appointed to confer during the year as to the strengthening of English Methodism



**SOCIAL PURITY**:—The Conference receives and adopts the Report of the Committee.

1. The Conference rejoices over the emphatic condemnation pronounced by the House of Commons on the Contagious Diseases Acts in India, and at the same time renews its protest against the perpetuation of any such legislation in any part of the Empire, whether Colony or Crown Dependency.

2. The Conference cannot but express its grief and indignation that in Fiji, where so large a portion of the population is under the pastoral charge of the Wesleyan Church, the Contagious Diseases Acts are still enforced; and instructs the Social Purity Committee to obtain information and take suitable steps in order to secure their absolute repeal.

3. The Conference considers that Rescue Work should be associated, wherever practicable, with the Special Mission work now being carried on in our large centres of population.

## THE 'ALLAN LIBRARY.'

The following Report of the Committee of the 'ALLAN LIBRARY' is adopted by the Conference:—

The Committee has met twice during the year.

The Books of the Library are in good condition and are carefully tended. Valuable contributions of Books and Pamphlets have been made during the year by Messrs. Edward Cooper and W. Willmer Pocock; the Rev. William J. Brown, Nehemiah Curnock, and John Holmes; Miss Handyside, Mrs. M'Millan, Mrs. Jobson, and Mrs. W. M. Bunting; and the best thanks of the Committee have been presented to the donors for their acceptable gifts.

The negotiations for the sale of the Centenary Hall having been abandoned for the present, communications were re-opened with the Trustees with a view to the transfer of the Library to that house.

Since the foregoing arrangement was projected an alternative proposal has been mentioned, which, however, if it can be carried out, would be much more advantageous. It is expected that it will be submitted to the Committee during the ensuing year.

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#### CONFERENCE PROCEDURE.

The Conference receives the Report of the Committee appointed to consider the Order of Procedure and Rules of Debate, and resolves as follows:—

##### 1. ORDER OF PROCEDURE.

The following shall be the Order of Business in the Conference, day by day:—

(1) Reading the Daily Record.

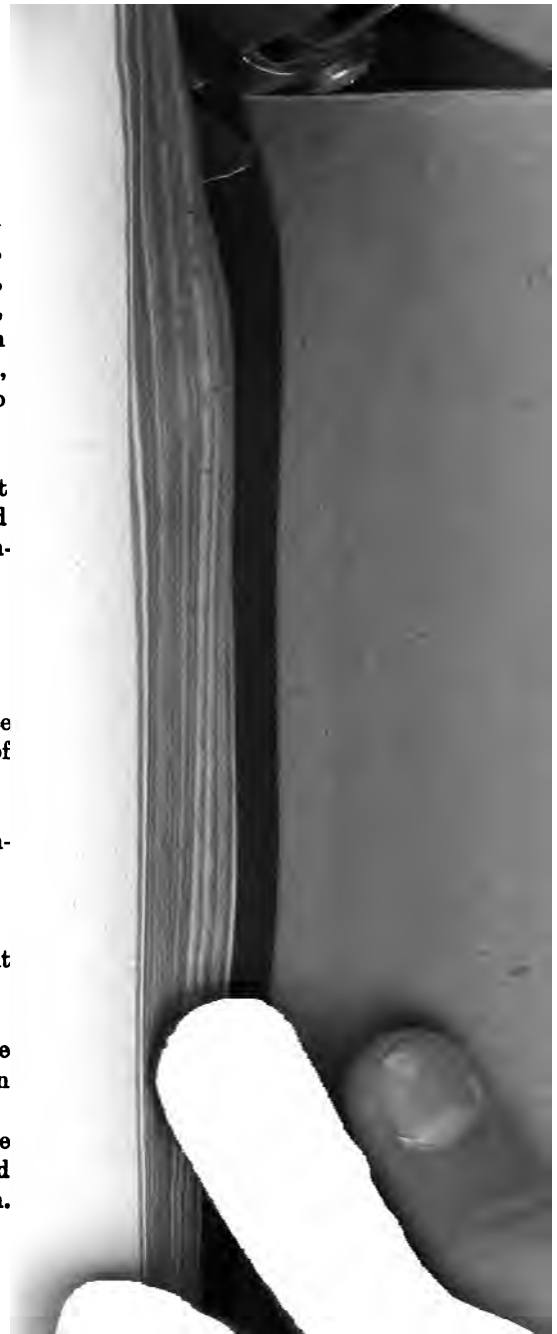
(2) Communications, Letters, etc.

(3) Any Notice of Motion not arising out of current business.

(See *Minutes* 1886, p. 391). *Notices of Motion.*

i. Notices of Motion should be presented not later than the second day of the Conference; but such notices may be given subsequently, if occasion arise.

ii. No motion on any subject not before the Conference in the ordinary course of its business, can be considered until after twenty-four hours' notice thereof has been given.



## (4) Reports of Committees.

*N.B.*—Nothing in this Rule shall prevent the reception of the Report of a Committee at any other time when the Conference may think it necessary or desirable.

(5) The Questions as they follow in the 'Order and Form of the Business of the Conference.'

(6) Any other matter which it may be necessary or convenient to deal with before the Conference adjourns.

## 2. RULES OF DEBATE.

*Preamble.*—Whereas much of the business of the Conference has been, and should continue to be conducted in the form of conversations, Rules 10, 11, and 20 shall not apply except when a formal resolution has been duly placed before the Conference.

(1) When any member wishes to address the Conference, he shall rise and address the President, but shall not proceed until the President calls upon him.

(2) No member shall remain standing during a discussion, except the member addressing the President.

(3) No member shall speak more than once on the same question without leave of the Conference, except as provided for in the Preamble.

(4) The mover of a substantive resolution shall have a right of reply, but not the mover of an amendment. The reply must be limited to answering the arguments advanced against the motion.

(5) All motions and resolutions shall be presented in writing by the proposer, at the time the proposition is made, and shall be immediately handed to the Secretary.

(6) Motions of which due notice has been given, shall, unless in special cases, be dealt with under the departments to which they relate or refer.

(7) When a resolution has been moved and seconded, it shall not be withdrawn without the consent of the Conference.

(8) The seconder of a resolution may reserve his speech.

(9) A Report of a Committee officially presented shall be received without motion, but its adoption, as a whole or by clauses, shall be moved and seconded.

(10) No motion or resolution on any other subject, shall be submitted until the one under consideration is disposed of. This may be done by withdrawal (Rule 7), adoption, or rejection, or by one of the following motions :—

i. Amendment of the subject matter, either by varying the terms, omission, or addition.

(a) Should an amendment be carried, it becomes the substantive motion, and thereon an amendment may be proposed. But if no further amendment is proposed, the amendment (which has become the substantive motion) shall be put without further discussion.

Should the amendment be lost, and no further amendment be proposed, the original motion shall be put without further discussion.

(b) No second amendment shall be submitted until the first is disposed of, though any speaker may give notice of his intention to propose a second amendment if the first should not be carried.

ii. Any of the following motions, which would be in order whether a motion or a motion with amendment were before the Conference.

(a) 'The previous question'—which shall be put to the Conference in the following form: 'That the Resolution (or resolution and amendment) before the Conference be not put.' This may be discussed concurrently with such resolution or amendment.

If the 'previous question' be carried, the resolution or amendment before the Conference cannot be put. If it be not carried, the discussion may proceed.

(b) 'The Order of the Day,' *i.e.*, that the next business as ordered by the Conference be now taken.

(c) The postponement of the question either to a definite time, or to a time to be hereafter fixed.

(d) Reference to a Committee.

iii. Adjournment.

(a) Of the Debate.

(b) Of the Conference.

(11) Should an amendment be carried, it becomes the substantive motion, and thereon an amendment may be proposed. But if no further amendment is proposed, the amendment (which has become the substantive motion) shall be put without further discussion. If the amendment be lost, and no further amendment be proposed, the original motion shall be put without further discussion.

(12) No second amendment shall be submitted until the first is disposed of, though any speaker may give notice of his intention to propose a second amendment if the first should not be carried.

(13) A motion 'That the vote be now taken' may be presented by any member: but no discussion shall be allowed thereon. If the motion should be carried by a majority of not less than two-thirds of those voting, the President shall forthwith call upon the member, if any, who may have the right of reply, and immediately thereafter shall put the question.

(14) At the close of a discussion the President shall request all members to be seated, and the resolution shall be read.

No member shall speak after the President has risen to put the question to the Conference.

(15) A motion to rescind any resolution of the Conference can be submitted only after notice duly given.

(16) The President shall call to order any speaker who departs from the question, or violates the courtesies of debate.

(17) The President shall decide all questions of order.

(18) A member may rise to a point of order, when he deems the rules of debate or the regulations of the Conference to have been violated. He must submit the 'point of order' to the President. Upon the question of order being raised, the member addressing the Conference shall take his seat, and retain it until the 'point of order' is decided.

(19) A member who thinks himself misrepresented by a speaker, may, by the indulgence of the Conference, interrupt the speaker to correct the misstatement; but he must not enter into argument.

(20) Questions which relate to the rights and privileges of the Conference, or of individual members thereof, or to the order of business, shall have precedence.

(21) All Reports of District and other Committees, and all Official Documents, shall be read from the platform.

(22) The President shall nominate for the consideration of the Conference all Committees, except as it may be otherwise ordered, either specially or in the standing regulations of the Conference.

#### METHODIST UNION :

##### WASTE AND FRICTION IN THE WORKING OF METHODIST CHURCHES.

I. The Conference in its Pastoral Session receives the Report of the Committee on the waste and friction in the working of the Methodist Churches, and resolves :—That the following recommendations be remitted to the District Committees in May, when Ministers only are present, and that the Resolutions of the District Committee thereon shall be considered by the special Committee on the Order of the Sessions of the Conference (p. 297), which Committee shall prepare a report for the next Conference.

1. That the Conference be advised to express its willingness (1) to receive Representatives from the Conference of the Methodist New Connexion, the Primitive Methodists, the Bible Christians, and the Annual Assembly of the United Methodist Free Churches, on the same conditions and in the same way as the Conference now receives Representatives from the Methodist Episcopal Church, and from various affiliated Conferences ; and (2) to appoint Representatives to attend the respective Conferences and Annual Assembly.

2. That in order to promote brotherly intercourse the Conference be asked to recommend that, where it should be deemed practicable and desirable, united meetings for Christian fellowship should be held, such as Communion Services and Love-feasts ; that an interchange of pulpits should be occasionally arranged, and that meetings of Ministers and other Representa-



tives of the various Methodist Churches should be periodically held.

II. The Conference in its Representative Session receives the Report of the Committee, and directs that the recommendations printed above, with the addition of the following, as a third Resolution, be referred to the District Committees in May, when Laymen are present, and that the resolutions of the District Committees thereon shall be considered by the Special Committee on the Order of the Sessions of the Conference (p. 297), which Committee shall prepare a Report for the next Conference.

III. That the Committee does not see its way at the present time to propose any general scheme of mutual withdrawal where the work of the various Methodist Churches overlaps by which waste of friction can be avoided; but it suggests that, at any rate for the future, the needless multiplication of Methodist chapels in the same locality might to some extent be discouraged, through periodical meetings of Ministers and other Representatives of the Methodist Churches, for consultation as already suggested, or by other possible means of consultation. And, at the same time, the Committee suggests that it be an instruction to the Chapel Committee, before sanctioning any new erection, to enquire into the accommodation provided by the other Methodist Churches in the same neighbourhood.

(N.B.—The Conference in its Representative Session directs that the following alternative form for the first recommendation be submitted for consideration to the District Committees, when Laymen are present:—

That the Conference be advised to express its willingness (1) to receive Representatives from the Conference of the Methodist New Connexion, the Primitive Methodists, the Bible Christians, and the Annual Assembly of the United Methodist Free Churches, in a Session to be arranged for the purpose; and (2) to appoint Representatives to attend similar specially arranged sessions of such Conferences and Annual Assembly).

ORDER OF PASTORAL AND REPRESENTATIVE  
SESSIONS OF THE CONFERENCE.

I. The Conference in its Pastoral Session receives the Report of the Committee. This Session of the Conference has not hitherto had this matter under consideration; and as the proposed change involves an alteration in the present mode of electing Ministers, both to the Legal Conference and to the Offices of President and Secretary, and also affects the arrangements agreed upon in the Scheme for Lay Representation in the Conference, adopted in 1877, the proposal is deferred for further consideration. The Conference in its Pastoral Session directs that the Report of the Committee shall be considered by the District Committees in May when Ministers only are present. It appoints the following Committee to receive the Resolutions of the District Committees when Ministers only are present, and to prepare a Report thereon, for the Conference in its Pastoral Session :—

The PRESIDENT and SECRETARY of the Conference, the EX-PRESIDENT, Rev. William Arthur, M.A., John Bond, William J. Brown, J. Ernest Clapham, Forster Crozier, W. Theophilus Davison, M.A., Dr. Greeves, James E. Hargreaves, Marshall Hartley, Hugh Price Hughes, M.A., E. Ashton Jones, Ishmael Jones, Thomas M'Cullagh, Wallace M'Mullen, George W. Olver, B.A., Dr. Osborn, George Penman, Henry J. Pope, Dr. Rigg, G. II. The Conference in its Representative Session receives the Report, and directs that it be considered in the District Committees in May, when Ministers and Laymen are present. It appoints the following Committee to receive the Resolutions of the District Committees when composed of Ministers and

Laymen, and to prepare a Report thereon for the Conference in its Representative Session :—

The Ministers referred to above, together with Messrs. Thomas H. Bainbridge, John Beauchamp, John Brewer, Percy W. Bunting, M.A., Skelton Cole, John Cooper, Charles B. Davidson, John Dyson, J. Willcox Edge, T. Morgan Harvey, John R. Hill, Edward Hoyle, William Hunt, John Wesley Lewis, John H. Mason, Thomas F. C. May, William Middlebrook, Thomas G. Osborn, M.A., Robert W. Perks, W. Oliver Quibell, Clarence Smith, William Bickford-Smith, M.P., James S. Sutcliffe, J. Thorp Taylor, James E. Vanner, Lewis Williams, and one Layman from each District, to be elected by the Lay members of the District Committee, by ballot after nomination. The Rev. Dr. Stephenson is the Convener.

#### ECUMENICAL CONFERENCE.

The Committee reports, that it has communicated with the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church of the United States, both by letter and by the Rev. Charles H. Kelly, on the proposal to hold an Ecumenical Methodist Conference in the United States, in 1891, on the same basis and the same general lines as those adopted for the Conference of 1881, and that a hearty preliminary agreement has been reached, and a Committee formed by the above-named Conference to promote the necessary arrangements. That, following the lines adopted for the promotion of the Conference of 1881, this Committee has left the negotiations with the other Methodist Churches of the United States and their offshoots to be opened and conducted by the Committee of the Methodist Episcopal Church. It further reports, that the various Methodist Churches in the section known in 1881 as the Eastern Section, and their offshoots, have all officially expressed their general concurrence.

The Conference receives and adopts the Report of the Committee, and resolves :—

1. The Conference sanctions the holding of a Second Œcumenical Conference in America in 1891 on the basis laid down for that of 1881.

2. The Committee is re-appointed, with power, if the authoritative replies of the other Methodist Churches when received prove favourable, to proceed on the lines adopted in 1880-81, and to prepare for a Conference in 1891.

## SECTION V.

## STANDING ORDERS.

1. *District Meetings, 1889.*—The Annual Meetings of the several District Committees shall be held between the 12th and 19th of May, with the exception of those of the North Wales, South Wales, Lincoln, Isle of Man, Edinburgh and Aberdeen, and Zetland Districts.

2. *Isle of Man District.*—It shall be a part of the business of the Financial District Meeting of the Isle of Man District to call the attention of Superintendents, and other Ministers who may be responsible, to the Regulations as to the duty of making certain Quarterly Returns to the Registrar-General of the Island, according to the provisions of the 'Dissenters' Marriage Act Amendment Act, 1885,' of the Isle of Man.

3. *Names and Addresses of Circuit Stewards.*—The Superintendents of Circuits are required to furnish the Chairman of the District with the names and addresses of the Circuit Stewards immediately after the December Quarterly Meeting; and, immediately after the March Quarterly Meeting, with the name and address of any Gentleman elected to attend the May District Meeting in the place of any Circuit Steward declaring his inability to attend such District Meeting.

4. *Admission of Members.*—Rule of 1797. It is not intended that the names of all those who are on trial should be laid before a Leaders' Meeting for distinct and formal discussion; but solely, that if there be, in the opinion of a Leader, any reasonable objection to the character and conduct of any person who is on trial, such objection may be stated by him; and that, if the validity of the objection be established to the

satisfaction of the Meeting, a Member's Ticket shall not be given to such person at the Quarterly Visitation.

5. *Trial of Members.*—When a charge is brought against any Member resident in a place where no Leaders' Meeting is stately held, the case shall be referred for investigation to the Leaders' Meeting of the principal Society in the Circuit Town. The Leader or Leaders, and the Society Stewards, of the Society of which the accused is a Member, shall be associated with the Leaders' Meeting for the purposes of the investigation.

If the accused person is a *Trustee*, then there shall also be associated with the Leaders' Meeting, as above constituted, the Trustees of the Chapel with which the Society of which he is a Member is connected; or, if there is no such Chapel, then the Trustees of the Chapel in connection with the principal Society in the Circuit Town. But no Trustee shall, in either case, be so associated, unless he is himself a Member of the Society in the same Circuit.

6. *Attendance of Ministers at Official Meetings.*—All the Ministers and Preachers on Trial appointed to a Circuit have a constitutional right to take part as members in our Leaders' Meetings, and in all other official meetings of the Circuits to which they are appointed.

7. *Probationers and the Lord's Supper.*—The Conference resolves that, in compliance with a former injunction on this subject, the Superintendents be required to make the necessary arrangements, in their Circuit-Plans, for securing to their junior Colleagues proper facilities for partaking of this Holy Sacrament.

8. *Resolutions on Pastoral Work.*—The Conference directs that the 'Resolutions,' as far as the words 'counted for a forest,' be read in the stead of the 'Liverpool Minutes' at each Annual District Meeting, and at the Ministers' Meeting of each Circuit in September. And the Chairmen of Districts are directed to make enquiry concerning the due observance of this regulation. (*Minutes*, 1885, pp. 356-366.)

The Conference further resolves that a copy of the 'Resolu-

tions on Pastoral Work' be presented, under the direction of the Chairman of each District, to every Preacher on Trial on his first appointment to a Circuit. (*Minutes*, 1885, p. 183.)

9. *Supplies for Ministers.*—Any Minister needing a Supply is directed to communicate with the Chairman of the District before applying to the President; and the Chairman is also directed to satisfy himself, by personal enquiry, that an efficient local Supply cannot be obtained. And such Minister, when he gives notice to the President that after a given date the services of the Supply will be no longer required, shall at the same time notify the fact to the Chairman of the District.

10. *Reading of the Pastoral Address.*—The Superintendents are directed to appoint special Society Meetings, to be held at the principal Chapels in their Circuits, for the purpose of having the Pastoral Address read, and made the subject of suitable remarks and exhortations.

11. *Recognition of New Members.*—The public and formal Recognition of New Members of Society is in accordance with early Methodist usage. A public welcome given by the Society tends to encourage the New Members, whilst the formal recognition will deepen their sense of responsibility. Such recognition might be associated with the administration of the Lord's Supper; or it might be found expedient to recognise New Members at a Society-meeting after the Quarterly Visitation of the Classes; or, in villages, a Recognition Service might take the place of a week-evening service.

The Conference, therefore, directs that, from time to time, meetings for the Recognition of New Members be held, as far as practicable, in every Circuit, subject to the discretion of the Superintendent as to the frequency and exact nature of such meetings.

12. *Annual Return of Members.*—The number of Members in the Society, and of persons admitted on trial, as taken at the *March* Quarterly Visitation in each year, and reported at the District Meetings, shall be the number returned on the Minutes of the following Conference. These Returns of Members in

the Society are to be forwarded, immediately after the May District Meetings, to the REV. JOHN W. GREEVES, *Wesleyan Centenary Hall, Bishopsgate Street Within, London, E.C.*

13. *Sunday-School Official Meetings.*—The Superintendent Minister of the Circuit shall preside at the Annual Meeting (of the Committee and Subscribers); and also at all Meetings of the Committee, and at all Meetings of the Teachers. If at any one of the said Meetings the Superintendent Minister be not present, one of the other Ministers of the Circuit shall preside. If either at an Annual Meeting, or at a Meeting of the Committee, no Minister is present, the Meeting shall appoint one of the Officers of the Institution to act as Chairman. If at any Teachers' Meeting no Minister is present, one of the Superintendents of the School shall preside.

14. *Sunday-School Statistics.*—With a view of securing more correct returns from Sunday-Schools, it is an instruction to the Secretary or Secretaries of each School that, wherever practicable, the Schedule of Returns be submitted to the Local Committee before such Returns are presented to the Circuit Quarterly Meeting.

15. *Examination of Pupil-Teachers.*—The Conference directs that the Annual Examination of Pupil-Teachers in Religious Knowledge shall be held on the last Saturday in October and on the first Saturday in March; that the questions shall be prepared by the General Committee; that the Examination shall be held, either in the several Circuits by the Superintendent Ministers or their Colleagues, or at suitable places for Central District Examinations, as may be determined by the September District Meetings, and agreed to by the respective School Committees; and that the written answers shall be forwarded to the General Secretary, and shall be valued by a Central Board of Examiners to be elected by the General Committee.

The Conference further recommends that, in connection with Central Examinations, Meetings of Teachers and Pupil-Teachers

be held under the direction of the Chairman of the District and the District Educational Secretary.

16. *Quarterly Fast-Days*.—The days upon which the Quarterly Fast, appointed by Rule, is to be observed throughout the Connexion, for the following year, are, Fridays, September 21st, and December 21st, 1888; March 22nd, and June 21st, 1889.

17. *The Ballot in Quarterly Meetings, etc.*—The Conference declares that the practice of voting by Ballot in the administration of Methodism in our Circuits, is contrary to long-established usage, and that its adoption would in various ways be injurious to the interests of our Societies. (*Minutes*, 1884, p. 191).

18. *Discipline of Methodism*.—The Chairmen of Districts are enjoined to make particular enquiries at their Annual Meetings in reference to the several points of Discipline specified in the first Section of the Answer to Question XXVIII. in the Minutes of 1825.

19. *Interchanges of Ministers*.—The expenses of interchanges between Ministers residing in various Circuits, appointed by the Conference, shall in no case fall upon the Ministers themselves, but shall be provided by the Circuits concerned, under the direction of the District Meeting. (*Minutes*, 1878, p. 252.)

20. *Political Meetings in Wesleyan-Methodist Trust Premises*.—Having regard to the fact that a desire has been expressed in some places to use our Trust Property for the purpose of Political Meetings, the Conference declares that such uses are not contemplated by the provisions of any of our Trust Deeds; and it reminds Superintendents and Trustees that our Trust Properties can only be lawfully used for the purposes provided for in the Trust Deeds.

The Conference further expresses the conviction that any such use of the Premises as that suggested would be detrimental to the best interests of our Societies by endangering their peace and unity.

21. *Candidates for Admission on Trial*.—(1) Those Preachers who are recommended for Admission on Trial shall, at or about

the time of the Annual District Meeting, preach in the presence of, at least, three of the Ministers of the District Committee, to be selected by the Chairman, exclusive of the Superintendent by whom the Candidates respectively are proposed; and a special report of the Sermons shall be made in the District Meeting, and immediately forwarded in writing to the Secretaries of the Committee for the Examination of Candidates.

(2) The Conference directs that arrangements shall be made by the May District Meetings for the hearing of each Candidate by one Minister of the District, in addition to those who have heard him before his recommendation by the District Committee; and that such Minister shall forward his Report to the Rev. Charles H. Kelly, *Spanish Close, Wandsworth Common, S. W.*

22. *Candidates for the Ministry.*—1. Except when the Conference directs otherwise, accepted Candidates shall be sent forthwith to the Institution. 2. Except in special cases, the President's List of Reserve shall consist of men who have been trained in the Theological Institution. 3. To prevent the calling out of men in the course of their training, the attention of Ministers needing Supplies, and of Chairmen of Districts, is called to Standing Order, No. 9. 4. Candidates for the Ministry, who have obtained a Degree in any University of the United Kingdom, shall, on passing a satisfactory Examination in Theology, have the special consideration of the Conference in regard to the term of their Probation. (*Minutes*, 1886, p. 203)

23. *Candidates for the Ministry who are University Graduates.*—Those Candidates for the Ministry who have taken a Degree in any one of the Universities of the United Kingdom, shall not, of necessity, spend the full term of three years in the Theological Institution; but, on the recommendation of the Staff of the Branch, the term of their residence may be shortened. (*Minutes*, 1885, p. 185.)

24. *Preachers on Trial and Mr. Wesley's Works.*—Those Preachers on Trial who do not already possess Mr. Wesley's Works, are required to procure them during the period of their



probation; and shall be allowed to pay for them to our Book Steward by such instalments as may best suit their convenience. (*Minutes*, 1882, p. 224.)

25. *Preachers on Trial*.—Whenever it shall be found to be practicable, Preachers on Trial shall preach during the District Meetings.

26. *Candidates for Ordination*.—The Conference directs that Candidates for Ordination shall, at or before the May District Meeting, preach before three Ministers of the District, who shall report to the Meeting.

27. *Army and Navy Work*.—The following information shall be presented from each of our Military and Naval Stations to the District Committees at their Annual Meeting in May: together with a Report of the work done for the benefit of our Soldiers and Sailors. (1.) The number of declared Wesleyans in the Army and Royal Navy, including the Coastguard, taken for the 31st of December in each year. (2.) The number of Members of Society in the Army and Royal Navy, including the wives and children of soldiers and seamen. (3.) The average attendance at Divine Service during the year. (4.) The amount of capitation and other official payments for the year.

In the case of Home Stations, these Reports and Returns shall be submitted to the District Home-Mission Sub-Committee, who shall present them, with any needful remarks thereupon, to the District Committee.

28. *Home-Missionary Ministers*.—The Conference directs that a special enquiry shall be made at the May District Meetings, whether the Regulations for the employment of Home-Missionary Ministers, adopted by the Conference, have been faithfully observed in the Circuits to which Home-Missionary Ministers are appointed; and that a Report in each case shall be made to the Conference.

29. *Juvenile Home and Foreign Missionary Associations*.—In the case of Circuits which are not in a position to ask for the appointment of a Home-Missionary Minister, and to give the pledge required, but which feel the necessity of adopting some

plan of *Home-Missionary* operations, the subjoined allocation is allowed:—One-third of the sums received to be paid to the Funds of the Foreign Missionary Society, it being expressly understood that in every case the contribution to the Foreign Missions shall be at least equal to what has been presented from Christmas Offerings, on the average of several preceding years; one-third to the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund; one-third to the Circuit, to be expended in support of local movements of a *directly Home-Missionary character*, under the direction of the Superintendent, and of a Committee to be appointed at the December Quarterly Meeting. (*Minutes*, 1863, Vol. XV., p. 528; and 1877, Vol. XX., p. 398.)

30. *Lay Members of District Committees*.—The Chairmen of Districts shall be required to send a Circular to the Lay Members of the District Committee, requesting their attendance on the Wednesday, and, if necessary, on the Thursday, in the week of the Annual District Meeting; specifying the business that will be brought forward, and particularly mentioning any subject that may have been specially remitted by the Conference to the consideration of such Meeting.

A similar Circular shall be prepared and sent with reference to the Financial District Meeting.

31. *Representative to the Stationing Committee*.—The Minister who shall be the Representative of any District to the Stationing Committee shall be chosen by the united votes of the Ministers and Laymen who are members of the District Committee.

32. *Election of Ministers to attend the Conference in its Representative Session*.—1. The election shall be made from among the whole number of Ministers in any District who desire to attend the Conference. 2. The Ministers so elected shall have permission to attend the Conference in its Pastoral Session. 3. The Ministers necessary to complete the number to attend the Conference in its Pastoral Session shall then be elected. 4. In the event of any Minister elected to attend the Conference in its Representative Session offering to



'provide for himself,' his election shall not thereby be rendered void. (*Minutes*, 1886, p. 199.)

33. *Division of Circuits*.—Before District Committees consent to the division of any Circuit, enquiry must be made whether due attention has been paid to satisfactory arrangements for the Trust-Estates affected by the proposed division, especially in reference to any debts existing thereon.

For Regulations as to Division of Circuits, see *Minutes*, 1886, pp. 270—273.

34. *Boundaries of Circuits*.—Whereas difficulties have arisen from the want of accurate and recorded definitions of the boundaries of Circuits, the Conference directs that, in future, the boundaries of Circuits which are divided shall be fully stated in the Minutes of the District Meeting to which they belong, and that the Secretary of the District shall send a copy of the record to be inserted in the Minutes of the Quarterly Meetings of the Circuits concerned; and that, in such cases, copies of the Ordnance maps, or some other maps, of the localities concerned, be coloured, so as to show the boundaries, and deposited in the safes provided for the custody of the Trust-Deeds of the Circuits. The Conference further directs that these arrangements be made in all cases of alteration in the boundaries of existing Circuits.

35. *Minor District Meetings*.—In all cases in which the holding of a Minor District Meeting is rendered necessary, except under the Regulation of 1840, (*Min. Conf.*, Vol. IX., p.94, Question 25,) such Meeting shall be held in the District in which the accused party resides; the accused and the accuser selecting respectively two Ministers from the said District, who, with the Chairman thereof, shall constitute the Minor District Meeting.

Should either party refuse or decline to choose two Ministers, to act as members of the Meeting, the Chairman is empowered and directed to nominate them, so that the number required by Rule may be made up.

36. *District Minutes*.—The Chairmen of Districts are required to procure *three* complete copies of the Minutes of the several

Annual and other Meetings of the District Committees, transcribed according to the order of time in which such Meetings shall have been held, and duly signed by the Chairman and Secretary. One of these copies shall be inserted in the District Records; a second shall be reserved for the use of the Chairman and Financial Secretary at the Conference; and a third shall be sent to the REV. MARSHALL HARTLEY, *Centenary Hall, Bishopsgate Street Within, E.C.*, not later than June 20th, and delivered by him to the President on the first day of the Conference, to be preserved under his direction, as a document appertaining to the Connexion. The several copies of the last class shall be written on foolscap paper, that they may be annually bound together in one volume.

37. *Custody of Connexional Documents.*—In addition to the Journals and Daily Records of the Conference, and the Minutes of the several District Committees, the following Documents shall also be preserved:—The printed Agenda of the Conference; the Minutes of the Committee on Memorials and suggestions from year to year, with the Documents laid before that Committee, and the Resolutions of the Conference thereon; the Reports of any special Committees or Commissions appointed by the Conference; any legal opinion obtained from time to time by the direction of the Conference; and a Record of all Legacies and Funds left to the Connexion, of the place where the Trust Deeds are deposited, with the names of the Trustees, and the provisions (if any) for the renewal of the Trust; and when the Legacies have been finally disposed of, the Minute Books of the Trustees, showing the arrangements made; with any other Documents the safe custody of which the Conference may hereafter direct. (*Minutes*, 1882, p. 287-8.)

The Rev. John W. Greeves is appointed Custodian and Registrar. (*Minutes*, 1888, p. 283.)

38. *Schedules from Departments.*—As it is obviously desirable that the Committees appointed by the Conference to manage the several Departments of the business of the Connexion, in the intervals of its Session, should be furnished with as much

statistical information as possible on the matters of business severally confided to their care,—the Conference authorises them, through their appointed Officers, to send, when they deem it expedient, suitable Circulars and Schedules to the Superintendents, or to the Chairmen of Districts, as the case may require; and directs the Superintendents and Chairmen duly to return such Schedules properly filled up.

39. *Designations to Departmental Offices.*—Twelve months before the end of any term of Departmental Office, the Committee in charge of the Department shall submit to the Conference the names of three Ministers in nomination for that office; of whom the Officer for the time being may, or may not, be one. (*Minutes*, 1886, p. 204.)

40. *Elections to Departmental Offices.*—The Conference resolves that in any new appointment to a Departmental Office, the Minister elected shall have a clear majority of the total number of votes cast; and that when such majority is not obtained on the first ballot, a second ballot shall be taken on the first two—or, if necessary, the first three—names on the list which have the largest number of votes. (*Minutes*, 1883, p. 183.)

41. *Election of Chairmen of Districts.*—In the appointment of Chairmen, the Minister elected shall have a clear majority of the total number of votes cast, and according to the Standing Order relating to Elections to Departmental Offices. (*Minutes*, 1886, pp. 205, 295.)

42. *Committee on Appeals and other Cases.*—At each Conference, the President shall nominate, not later than the second day, a Committee of twenty-one members of the Conference, to whom shall be referred, without discussion, all cases requiring further enquiry touching the character of Ministers or Preachers on Trial, immediately after the reading of the Minutes of District Committees thereupon; or of any notice of charge or appeal relating thereto; or for any reason which the Conference may deem sufficient.

Any complainant or appellant, or any person under enquiry, may object to one in three of the members of the said Com-

mittee sitting on his case; and the President shall then appoint some other member of the Conference to act instead of the member so objected to.

Special Cases to be decided upon by the Conference may be referred to the whole Committee; but it shall, for ordinary purposes, be divided into three sections, for each of which a Convener shall be appointed, who shall be responsible for preparing the business of the Committee. (*Minutes, 1873, Vol. XIX., p. 202.*)

43. *Ministerial Members of Connexional Committees.*—No Minister, who is not an Officer of a Departmental Committee, shall remain as a Member of that Committee more than six consecutive years, unless he shall have been nominated for a further appointment thereon by the vote of four-fifths of the Members of the Committee present. (*Minutes, 1881, p. 270.*)

44. *Lay Members of Connexional Committees.*—In respect to the several Committees of the Connexional Funds, the Conference resolves, that a certain number of Lay Gentlemen, being at least one-sixth of the number of Lay Members of each Departmental Committee, shall annually retire from each Committee by rotation; the same persons being ineligible for immediate re-appointment, except in special cases, and after nomination for such re-appointment by the vote of four-fifths of the Members of the Committee present (*Minutes, 1882, p. 383 (5)*).

45. *Preparations for the Stationing Committee.*—The Representative of each District shall send to the Secretary of the Conference, not later than the 27th day of June in each year, upon a Schedule to be provided by him, complete lists of (1) the arrangements provisionally made for the appointment of Ministers to Circuits in his District, (2) the invitations accepted by Ministers in his District to Circuits in other Districts, and (3) all Ministers in his District for whom no arrangement has been made.

Also a list of all Ministers to be transferred from the Foreign to the Home Stations shall, at the same time, be furnished by the Missionary Secretaries to the Secretary of the Conference.

From these lists the Secretary of the Conference shall compile, and cause to be printed in a convenient form for use in the Stationing Committee, a Preliminary Draft of Stations embodying all arrangements thus provisionally made, and also a separate list of all Ministers for whom provisional arrangements have not been made; and a copy of these shall be furnished to each Member of the Stationing Committee, in London, on the Monday before the meeting of that Committee.

46. *Regulations of the Stationing Committee.*—1. The Stationing Committee shall, from year to year hold its first Session in London. 2. The appointments made shall not, as heretofore, be printed day by day. 3. The First Draft of Stations (as well as the Second and Final) shall be printed in the Conference Town. 4. The First Draft of Stations shall be an absolutely confidential document until the Representatives' Copies are ready for the post. 5. All Students who are leaving the Institution, and are eligible for appointment, shall be entitled to a copy of the First and Final Draft of Stations. 6. Each Representative shall send to the Secretary of the 'Conference Arrangements Committee' two sets of Addressed Wrappers, for the First and Final Draft, for the Ministers and Circuit Stewards in his District, and for Six other Laymen—Members of the District Committee; the cost of which shall be refunded by the 'Conference Arrangements Committee.' (*Minutes*, 1888.)

47. When deemed expedient, the Stationing Committee shall retire after the second reading of the Stations.

48. *The Ex-President and the Stationing Committee.*—The retiring President shall be, *ex-officio*, a Member of the Stationing Committee during the sittings of Conference.

49. *Numbering of Circuits and Stations.*—1. Except those in which no Minister's House is provided, all Stations appearing on the *Minutes* shall be numbered. 2. The Minister appointed to any Station without a number is the Superintendent, and is therefore entitled to preside in the Quarterly Meetings and in the Trustees' Meetings; but he shall, as

heretofore, act under the direction of the Chairman of the District. (*Minutes*, 1886, p. 204.)

50. *Conference Plan*.—The Superintendents of those Circuits in which the Conference may, from year to year, assemble, shall, with the previous approbation of the President, (as already required by Rule,) complete and print, not later than the 15th day of June in each year, a Plan of the order of preaching in the principal chapels during the Session of the Conference; and shall also, on or before the above date, send to every person whom they have appointed to preach in those chapels, a copy of the Conference Plan.

And in order that the Plan thus prepared may not be violated, to the disappointment of our friends, and to the great inconvenience of other parties concerned, no Minister who attends the Conference shall be at liberty to make an engagement to preach in any other Circuit, either on the Sabbath, or on any other day, during the period appointed for the meeting of the Conference, at the time for which his name shall be inserted on the Conference Plan.

51. *Conference Sessions*.—With a view to facilitating the despatch of the Conference business, there shall be two Sessions daily.

52. *Open Session of Conference*.—The Open Session shall be held on the evening of the second day of Conference each year.

53. *Rotation of the Conference*.—The Conference rescinds the Rule of 1873 (*Minutes*, Vol. XIX., pp. 196-7), which directs that the Conference shall hold its Sessions in London more frequently than in any other city or town. (*Minutes*, 1887, p. 193.)

54. *Question VII*.—In response to the enquiry in the Conference: 'Is there any objection to any Minister or Preacher on Trial?' the names of the Districts only shall be called, and the Chairman of each District shall then give the required information. The right to challenge any name, or bring a charge against any Minister, shall not be affected by this regulation.

55. *Memorandum of Agreement*.—The Memorandum of Agreement between the Conference and Candidates from other



Conferences and Churches shall apply in all particulars to married men who are accepted in the ordinary way as Candidates for the Ministry; and the payments required therein shall be made, and the privileges described therein shall begin to be enjoyed, in both cases, at the time of their admission into Full Connexion with the Conference. (*Minutes*, 1882, p. 289.)

56. *Ministers Becoming Supernumeraries for One Year.*—In all cases where a Minister who becomes a Supernumerary for one year is not a Member of the Annuitant Society, the amount which would have been paid to him as a Member of that Society shall be deducted from the extra grant made by the Committees of the Auxiliary Fund and of the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund. (*Minutes*, 1887, p. 261.)

57. *Supplies for Disabled or Deceased Ministers.*—(1.) Any Preacher sent by the President as a Supply shall be paid at the rate of thirty guineas a year, for the time he is in the Circuit; this allowance being in addition to Board and Lodging.

(2.) In respect of payment, the year of a trained man on the President's List of Reserve appointed in connection with, or immediately after, the Conference, shall reckon from the first day of September to the last day of August. (*Minutes*, 1887, pp. 259, 260.)

(3.) A Probationer whose name is on the List of Reserve, who is called out by the President before Christmas Day shall, at the ensuing Conference, be considered as having travelled one year. (*Minutes*, 1799, Vol. II., p. 24; 1812, Vol. III., p. 292.)

(4.) Any Minister on whose behalf a Supply has been appointed shall retain the Supply for one month after he has given notice to the President that his services will no longer be required, unless the President has employment for him sooner.

(5.) Any Student who has completed his training, and has been sent by the President as a Supply, should his services as a Supply be no longer required, shall be placed by the President under the direction of the Home Mission Committee, which shall be responsible for his maintenance.

(6.) In reference to all Preachers on Trial placed under their care, the Home Mission Committee shall always be entitled to a week's notice from the President before the unemployed Supply receives another appointment.

(7.) Any Student called out from the Institution to meet special emergencies before he has completed his training, if his services should no longer be required by the President, shall return to the Branch of the Institution to which he belongs until his term of training is complete.

(8.) The employment of Students as Supplies otherwise than by the President, during their vacation, shall continue as heretofore to be matter of private arrangement, in regard to which neither the President nor the Home Mission Committee shall have responsibility, except in those special cases in which the Home Mission Committee may grant Supplies to Chairmen of Districts for short periods.

(9.) The retiring President shall furnish to the Conference on the second day of its Session, a list of all Ministers who have had Supplies during any part of the preceding year, with the date in each case on which the Supply was sent, and withdrawn; and on receiving this list, the Conference shall appoint a Committee to enquire whether these Ministers are physically competent to take a Circuit. (*Minutes*, 1887, p. 260.)

58. *Supplies in relation to Circuit Appointments.*—A Probationer sent by the President, before Christmas, as a Supply, is not thereby disqualified for appointment for a third year to the Circuit where he served as a Supply. (*Minutes*, 1887, pp. 193-4.)

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THE ANNUAL ADDRESS  
OF THE  
CONFERENCE TO THE METHODIST SOCIETIES.

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DEAR BRETHREN,—

The Annual Conference of the Methodist Preachers assembled at Camborne sendeth greeting to the 'united Societies of the people called Methodists.' In taking the oversight of the flock 'of God which He hath purchased with His own blood,' we are glad to use our privilege of speaking to you words which we trust will prove to be words of help and counsel.

We give thanks at our remembrance of you, and heartily bless you in the name of the Lord. We pray that He will give you health and strength for the toil of life, and enable you to glorify Him 'in your *body*,' that He will bless you in mind and spirit; granting to you vigour of thought, force of will, purity of affection, that the 'God of hope' may 'fill you with all joy and peace in believing, that ye may abound in hope through the power of the Holy Ghost.' That He would bless your 'basket,' your commercial enterprise in our own or other lands, in the 'fruit of your ground, the fruit of your cattle, and the flocks of your sheep;' that He will bless your 'store;' that your wages may not be put into a 'bag with holes;' that 'He may not blow' upon your good when it is gathered home. We pray that He will bless your 'going out,' your friendships, your social life, your citizen relationships, keeping you free from all that is false or evil, and making you rich in the 'love of the brethren,' and in the 'honour that cometh from God;' that He would bless you in your 'coming in;' in your family life, in the Christian character of your sons and daughters, and in your place of secret prayer, giving you love for it, and nearness of access to Himself in it. As we thus pray for you, we know that 'God is able to make all grace abound towards you;

that ye, always having all sufficiency in all things, may abound to every good work.'

The greatest blessing we can desire for you, and that which includes all others, is that in a personal living Saviour 'you may have life, and that you may have it more abundantly,' that the kingship of Christ should be to you a blessed reality; that you should not only think of Him as King in heaven and on earth, but should know Him as King within your own heart. That He should be King of your thoughts, your purposes, your desires, your affections; King of your conscience, of your will, and of your life; that He should have the throne of your hearts; that He should be the 'soul of your soul,' Christ 'living in you.' This abundant life which in Scripture we are taught to speak of as 'perfect love,' 'being perfect,' being 'sanctified wholly,' is your common privilege. It is not designed to be the possession of a few rare spirits only, to be distributed among the disciples as the qualities of the artist or the poet are among men; but to be a common possession—as health or clearness of vision are. The 'glorious hope of perfect love,' a 'full salvation,' is for us all. Do not for a moment think yourselves free to neglect it or possess it as you may judge best; it is the duty as well as the privilege of every one. You cannot come short of it without 'grieving the Holy Spirit of God.' The experience of this would make preachers of heart-searching power, Sunday-school teachers whose love and prayer would bring the children to Jesus; Class-leaders of such diligence, such warmth of sympathy, so well instructed in the things of God, that their meetings would be all aglow with holy fire, and would render futile all attempts to make less sacred the duty of Christian fellowship.

We can only work our extensive and complex organization with a Christian experience that is whole-hearted. That organization is largely the production of piety at a white heat; and it can only be easily worked by the same temper of spiritual life. The intensely earnest life around us can only be influenced successfully by an intense life within us. Earnestness on this, the chief question, should pass all other earnestness in what it can be, what it can attempt, what it can achieve, and what it can endure. When commerce, science, politics, pleasure are moving quickly, we must not be slow paced, but must move more quickly than they. It must not content us that the doctrine of a full salvation is in our

standards, in our biography, in our hymnology, unless it is also in our hearts. If we do not render to the Lord of the vineyard this fruit of a full consecration, He will take the vineyard from us, and give it unto those who will bring to Him the fruit which this season of the world's growth pre-eminently needs. If we 'leave our first love' our 'candlestick' will be removed 'out of its place, except we repent.' It is only the ripe fruit which has the living seed within itself; an immature religious life is without the power of reproduction. In 1760 Mr. Wesley wrote: 'Here began that glorious work of Sanctification which had been nearly at a stand for twenty years; . . . and wherever the work of Sanctification increased the whole work of God increased in all its branches.' When he came to Bristol and found fifty fewer members, he wrote: 'One reason is, Christian Perfection has been little insisted on, and wherever this is not done, be the preachers ever so eloquent, there is little increase either in the number or the grace of the hearers.' His question about Exhorters was not: 'Have they grace?' but 'Are their lives eminently holy?' Not only for the sake of the world around, and for the sake of our work, but for our own sake we need this. It is only by vigorous spiritual health that we can throw off parasitic forms of worldly life; they come of a lowered spiritual vitality, and they lower it more and more. They thus prepare us for any doctrinal or ethical error which may be afloat in the literary atmosphere of our time.

One among us has wisely said: 'It is the heart alone which can keep the standard of doctrine pure.' Scepticism begins in estrangement of the soul from God. A clear experience of the love of God in Christ, and a life full of Christian work will be the best defence from those utterances of unbelief which abound in our land. We affectionately entreat you not to give any of them a place in your thoughts—'no, not for an hour.' We beseech you 'flee these things.' Never barter away the holy triumph of faith which our fathers knew for the barren life of living 'without Christ,' 'having no hope, and without God in the world.'

While 'we remember without ceasing your work of faith, and labour of love, and patience of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ,' and feel 'you are our glory and our joy,' we are however 'jealous over you with godly jealousy,' lest you should be 'beguiled' by the subtle, worldly influences around you.

Should we not have more conscience than to waste our time with a pack of cards, and thus guide young Methodist life to the excitements and ruin of the gaming table? Is it well to find pleasure in the extravagance, the frivolity, possibly the sensual allurements, of the ball room? Should we seize the opportunity of absence from home to spend evenings at the theatre, with a relish for the innuendoes and associations of such places, and to seize on these follies when the restraints of local opinion are withdrawn? Should we allow in any of our Schools that which cherishes the taste for such things? Shall we marvel when children so trained leave the Church and the God of their fathers? If they prefer a social life where these follies have a natural dwelling-place? In some parts of the country betting transactions will soon make some otherwise healthful sports unfit for the presence of the thoughtful and godly man. The feverish excitements of commercial speculation make some gains to be not those of honest labour or barter, but the ill-gotten gains of gambling. Should we not be sorrowful if any of you are partakers of these things? Our spirituality, seriousness, and fidelity should be such that these things could not be possible among us. There is a solemn meaning in 'Be not conformed to this world;' in 'Come out from among them, and be ye separate;' in 'If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him.' The Scripture saith: 'Have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather reprove them.' Our personal course and our Church course must be from 'faith to faith,' from 'strength to strength,' a 'shining more and more.' We must advance on the self-sacrifice, the spiritual power, the success, of early Methodist days. We must not have the name of the living while we have become dead.

We counsel you to frequently read in your Classes the Rules of our Societies. This will afford a good opportunity for earnest talk on practical Christianity. At one time it was found necessary to urge our Leaders sometimes to give attention to religious experience and feeling. To-day you need to be brought back to the prevailing subject of earlier meetings, and have conversation on Christian duties. The reading of the Rules at regular intervals would aid you in dealing with many questions which are of great moment to our generation and to ourselves. Mr. Wesley says: 'Your strictness of life, taking the whole of it together, may be

accounted new. Your plainness of dress; your manner of dealing in trade; your exactness in observing the Lord's day; your scrupulosity as to things that have not paid custom; your total abstinence from spirituous liquors (unless in case of necessity); your rule not to mention the fault of an absent person, in particular of ministers or of those in authority. . . . Although some are scrupulous in some of these things, and others are strict with regard to other particulars, yet we do not find any other body of people who insist on all these Rules together.' Again and again he says, what we would now earnestly say: 'Be true to your principles.' He also said, and would it not be well for us to say: 'Those who will keep these Rules, and those only, may continue with us'?

At this time we would affectionately call your attention to a group of important public duties. We want stalwart Christian citizens at the polling booth, on Boards of Guardians, on School Boards, in the Council Chamber, and in Parliament. We must urge you to put Christianity into your service of the commonwealth. If the government and institutions of the country are not to fall into the hands of mere politicians, then earnest Christians must not shrink from citizen duties. We shall always have among us various forms of political opinion; these are necessary to the health of the State; but in all their variety they may be held with brotherly affection and confidence. That is but a feeble Christian life, not worthy of the name, which can only be preserved by avoiding the toils, the responsibilities and conflicts of the national life of our time. We beseech you to cultivate the character which will make you a conscience wherever you are; so that you will bravely denounce wrong from the magistrates' bench, in the directors' meeting, or in the senate; which will recognise that the greatest curse of our time; of all times, is sin, and that against this the chief fight must be. To maintain the 'righteousness' which 'exalteth a nation,' and to prevent the exaltation of 'vile men,' Methodists of every political colour should be as the heart of one man.

We thankfully note the ingenuity, the daring enterprise and success which have marked aggressive movements in large city populations during the year. The crowds of worshippers gathered in London, Manchester and Birmingham, in localities where for many years we had old chapels which were all but empty, teach us that if we only use the gifts bestowed by



the Holy Ghost on ministers and people, and adapt our modes to changing circumstances,—we may pass the successes of our fathers. Breaches are not made in the strongholds of indifference, ignorance or vice, and when made already are not held, by a lukewarm zeal. When 'in the name of our God we set up our banners,' we must have a holy enthusiasm which will carry these strongholds by assault, and which will die rather than permit our banners to be taken.

We do well to note, however, that this is not the only nor yet the chief work done. Much of the best work never appears in the public paper, and many of the most useful and successful workers are those whose story must be told by others if ever told at all; nay, who would be less free to work if they felt the public gaze was directed towards them, but whose daily self-denials and abundant labours will have the 'Well done!' of the Master. Those of you who, after your week of hard work in trade, give painstaking attention to the Sunday-school, who travel many miles to serve the village congregation, and that despite the loss of favour and profit from the village magnates; who lack the stimulus of crowds and the applause of your fellows, who maintain Circuit and Connexional finance by generous gifts and methodical work,—you constitute the abiding strength of our progress; and no mere novel forms of service can do instead of these, or without these. The feats of the athlete would be impossible if the less noticed processes of physical life were not continually performed; so also the spiritual prowess, which we watch with admiration and thankfulness, would not be possible unless we had that basis of strength which is maintained by quiet, continuous, self-denying and unostentatious service.

We are now considering how best to render help to our villages. Some of the most honoured names on our ministerial roll came to us from the villages. Many of the laity in our cities, who hold high place by virtue of integrity, wisdom and earnest piety, were brought to God in the village chapel. These small, secluded populations have been the feeders of our large town Societies. We must not rest until the Gospel of Christ is plainly, earnestly and constantly preached in every English village. Where it is possible, we had best work through existing Circuit organization, but in many places we must go beyond it. We must not let the wish to keep a Circuit compact and easy cause us to resist either an extension of its boundary

or an invasion of that boundary. Neither must the record of previous failure, nor the fear of new responsibility, impede us in this work. Generous gifts will be necessary. Many of you have received much from the villages; be ready to acknowledge how much you owe to them. We are called to this work not only by personal obligation and the love of souls, but also by the love of country. The House of Representatives will not go beyond the moral and religious tone of the electors. We can only raise the character of our Senate by ennobling the character of those who choose our senators.

Let each ask himself: Am I doing all I can to make 'the kingdoms of this world become the kingdoms of our Lord, and of His Christ'? Am I praying for our work abroad, and giving to it, as if I realized the tremendous issues involved in it? In this great struggle between truth and falsehood, between right and wrong, between Christ and the Evil One, our utmost energies will be needed. Deep conviction, fervent feeling, great self-denial are essential to this service. The loiterer, the self-indulgent, the coward can have no place here. We must be watchful, lest by any means our councils should become divided. There has never been a period in our mission history, when in the most difficult fields of work, and among the largest populations, our successes have been so great. In India and China our weapons are 'mighty through God to the pulling down of strongholds;' and we must look for and resist those subtle devices of Satan by which our workers will be disheartened, our resources diminished, and our operations enfeebled. Let us be as the heart of one man in maintaining our great Missionary Society, and not allow 'the god of this world' to rob us of the victory for which we and our fathers have long prayed and toiled, just as we are securing it. We shall imperil our home interests if we neglect our foreign work. Gather with Christ we must, according to His purpose and in His Spirit, or we shall surely scatter what we have already secured.

The increase of members during the year awakens gratitude and hope. The net result of 3,523 only indicates imperfectly what our multiplied agencies have accomplished. The number of new members received is 47,891. These have been brought out of the world into the Church of Christ, have ranged themselves on the Lord's side, and have attached themselves to us. It has always been ours to add to other Churches; the branches have 'run over the wall,' and are fruit-bearing in other vine-



yards beside our own. Many of those who once met with us and have become members of other sections of the Church of Christ, are found among their most earnest preachers, most diligent workers and most generous contributors.

We mark with thankfulness that during the year the various branches of the Methodist family have been drawn nearer together. By the gracious leading of the Holy Spirit there has been the 'laying aside' of many 'envies and evil speakings.' We and they shall be stronger if we stand in 'close and firm array' against doctrinal error and moral evil. On such questions as Sabbath observance, purity and temperance, we may stand shoulder to shoulder as 'good soldiers of Jesus Christ.' In all forms of Christian work, in every place, let us aid them, encourage them, pray for them, and bless them in the name of the Lord.

The year has removed from among us forms we have loved to see, and voices we have rejoiced to hear. John Harvard, Benjamin Hellier, William M'Arthur and James Barlow, with others of great worth, have 'entered into the joy of their Lord.' Through their removal we are poorer in Christian fervour, in gentle goodness, in wise counsel, in generous gifts. The Lord gave them to us, and He has taken them away. 'We bless His holy Name for His servants who have departed this life in His faith and fear;' we beseech Him 'to give us grace so to follow their good examples, that with them we may be partakers of His heavenly kingdom.'

'Now the God of peace, that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting Covenant, make you perfect in every good work to do His will, working in you that which is well-pleasing in His sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory for ever and ever.' 'Now unto Him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of His glory with exceeding joy, to the only wise God our Saviour, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, now and ever. Amen.'

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DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

Once again we send you our hearty greeting, and pray that grace, mercy and peace may rest upon you continually. We rejoice that we are one with you not only in government and faith, but also in the grand and glorious object to which we consecrated our lives, to advance the Kingdom of Righteousness amongst our fellow-men. We glory in your successes as though they were our own. We exult in your triumphs in home and missionary fields, and we gather heart for greater effort in our loved toil when we read of your forward movements, and your abundant and self-sacrificing labours. We are thankful for the true sympathy which you have ever manifested to us, and the abundant help which your generosity has prompted you to afford us in order that our work may be efficiently maintained.

The brethren who have come to us this Conference we have received with affectionate esteem, not only on their own behalf, but also because they are your honoured and chosen Representatives; beloved by you, we open our hearts to them. They have helped and stimulated us by words of wisdom in our daily sessions, and by their impressive, eloquent and cultured pulpit deliverances. The President, the Rev. John Walton, M.A., and the Ex-President, the Rev. Dr. Young, have been with us before, and it delights us to welcome them again. The Rev. Joseph Bush and the Rev. J. Ernest Clapham, familiar by name to us all, some of us meet for the first time; we are happy in knowing that it is but the beginning of our acquaintance.

Death has been very busy in our ranks during the year.

Eight honoured Supernumeraries and two brethren in the active work, while it was yet noon, have been called to their reward.

Many amongst you are familiar with the peculiar and formidable character of the difficulties with which we have to contend, and you will rejoice with us that we are able to report a cheering increase in membership. Would that it were larger; thank God that it is so large! There have been on many of our Circuits very gracious revivals. The visits of the General Missionaries have been attended by awakening and conversion of souls. We never had freer access to the people. The open doors are many; the calls for increased labour are loud and earnest. God has given us ten promising candidates for the Ministry. Our Laymen are taking a deeper and more devoted interest than ever, perhaps, in the Church's work. Amongst them we have many examples of self-denying zeal and loyal surrender to the claims of Christ, for which we magnify the grace of God.

Our efforts on behalf of Higher Education have been crowned with success. The records of our two Colleges may well make us proud. The highest distinctions offered by the University of the Kingdom have been gained by their pupils. We grieve that Wesley College has been burdened by a serious debt on the building, the interest on which has absorbed its income and retarded its work. We have set free from Circuit work the Rev. John W. Jones, and appointed him to the special business of endeavouring to extinguish this debt.

We cannot pass from this subject of Higher Education without making more than a passing allusion to one who for years held a foremost place in British Methodism, and who was one of the best friends God ever raised up for Irish Methodism, the princely Sir William M'Arthur, K.C.M.G. He loved Ireland, the land of his birth. He understood her as few do. He knew how best to help her, and he did it. His munificent benefactions and endowments will be for generations among the potent forces working for Ireland's elevation and regeneration.

Primary Education has had a large share of attention, though not as large as the importance of the work demands. Besides several Mission Schools, which are in a fair state of efficiency, we have now under our management 81 National Schools, the majority of them being of a high character. In 1880 we had

60 Schools, with 5,200 pupils; we have now 7,600 pupils. We had then 1,351 Methodists in attendance; we have now 2,588. Our teachers then received from the Commissioners about £4,000 in Salary and Results' Fees; they now receive about £6,000. These facts speak for themselves. The annual Examinations held in the Schools fully attest the value of the instruction afforded in Scripture and Catechism. We are still urging our people to avail themselves more extensively of the valuable aid offered by the Commissioners of National Education, and would again express our approval of the system of united secular and separate religious Education.

We are thankful, dear fathers and brethren, to be in a position to tell you that there are evident signs of life and growth throughout our whole Connexion. We have strong faith in Methodism; our people are as true and as devoted to her interests as ever they were, and as anxious for her prosperity; and more than ever there is the desire and effort to reach those outside, and to make them partakers of our blessings, whether they seek membership amongst us or not.

We wish also to convey to you an expression of our united and earnest desire that the ties which bind our country to yours may not in any wise be loosened. We would deeply deplore any measure which would tend to the disintegration of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

We have nominated, as the Irish member of the Delegation, the Rev. Wallace M'Mullen, who, with the Rev. George Robinson and the Rev. Robert S. Lee, are our chosen Representatives to your Conference. May the richest blessing of our common Lord rest upon you in your coming Conference, that whatsoever you do may be to the glory of God.

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REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,

Your Address has been received with feelings of the liveliest interest, and prompts in our hearts many thanksgivings to God, with earnest applications on your behalf. Our sympathies with you have been sustained and deepened by the presence and by the public utterances of your distinguished Representatives. The Rev. Wallace M'Mullen has for many years held an honoured place in the roll of our own Conference. His name is familiar and endeared to us; and his voice is always welcome in our assemblies. His companions we heartily receive on your account and on their own.

We 'salute you much in the Lord.' Amongst the numerous Conferences and associated Churches of Wesleyan-Methodism you hold a unique position, being, indeed, a part of ourselves; and your essential institutions and cherished traditions are identical with our own. To you we owe, under God, some of the noblest and most gifted men that have ever adorned our history. Your unabated love and attachment to ourselves we warmly reciprocate.

We rejoice to learn that, notwithstanding the social unsettlement and disquiet prevailing in Ireland, your Churches are kept in peace, and are walking in the comfort of the Holy Ghost; and that you have experienced during the past year a goodly measure of spiritual prosperity and increase. Amidst many discouragements, and surrounded by powerful and threatening forms of evil and error you can say: 'Thou, O Lord, art in the midst of us,'—Thou that 'art the hope of Israel, the Saviour thereof in time of trouble.' In this fact is your consolation and your security. The political contentions of the day, which

touch so nearly the vital interests of religion and morality, and are so rife with occasions of division, are motives to us for devoting ourselves with renewed energy and singleness of mind to the work of the Lord. We repeat to you and to ourselves the maxim of our venerable founder, We have nothing to do but to save souls. In the salvation of individual souls lies the salvation of society, the safety and the moral strength of nations.

Your report of the 'open doors' presented to you and the comparatively 'free access to the people' which you enjoy, is matter of great satisfaction to us. Ireland is the centre and spring of Romanist influence amongst the English-speaking races; and we look with eagerness for every sign of the advance of Methodism as an energetic and evangelical form of Protestantism within your country. Your 'General Missionaries' bear a title that awakens glorious memories of evangelistic triumph; and we are thankful to hear of their continued success. In the use of this Apostolic class of labourers you anticipated the renewed employment among ourselves of Home Missionaries for large regions of the country, which has tended not a little to the revival and extension of religion in British Methodism. But it is needful to take pains and care that the every-day life and fellowship of our societies are correspondingly deepened and enriched, and that our ordinary Circuit ministrations are made increasingly efficient; otherwise these wider and more extraneous agencies will prove to be but a partial and temporary benefit. They must be a supplement to the regular local activities of the Church, and in no case a substitute for them. These are amongst the most important lessons which we are now learning; and you have probably had similar lessons suggested to you by your own experience.

You are following, we doubt not, with close attention the new developments taking place in our Home Missionary organization, both in large cities and in rural districts. We feel that very much depends for the future of Methodism on the success of these enterprises. Of this success we are already reaping a blessed earnest. We desire that you 'strive together with us in your prayers to God' on our behalf, that on our Home and Foreign Missions alike there may descend the showers of reviving grace for which we so greatly long.

Your Annual Addresses never fail to give evidence of your zeal in the promotion of Methodist education. Whatsoever

you do in this respect you do wisely and well. Your efforts and sacrifices are an example to us. You will have your reward in the devotion of your own cultured children to the Church of their fathers, and in witnessing the spread of Christian intelligence throughout your country. We congratulate you both on the brilliant University distinctions lately achieved by your scholars, and on the largely increased share which you have taken during the last eight years in National Primary Education.

We deeply mourn with you the removal of Sir William M'Arthur from our midst by death. His noble generosity, his frank and genial courtesy, his enlightened Christian fervour, exhibited the best features of the Irish and the Methodist nature. We are thankful that in his death, as in his life, he has been enabled to give such ample proof of his regard for the welfare of your public institutions.

Finally, brethren, we cannot but observe the grave apprehension which the course of public events in recent years excites in your minds. On the causes of that apprehension we refrain from passing any judgment. Your trouble and alarm must needs be a grief to us. We solemnly commend your interests to Him Who is 'Head over all things to His Church,' and on whose shoulder rests the government of the nations. Human judgment and foresight are constantly at fault on this side and on that, in these great questions of national destiny. We would fain trust that Almighty God, in His inscrutable wisdom, is preparing for us all in these troubles of the time some great and abiding blessing. Let us be patient, therefore, brethren: 'the Judge of all the earth' 'will do right.'

We have elected, on your nomination, the Rev. James Wilson as a member of the Legal Conference, in place of the Rev. John Donor Powell, whose premature decease we lament. We have appointed the Revs. John Walton, M.A., Henry John Pope, and T. Bowman Stephenson, LL.D., to accompany our President to your next Conference.

We invoke upon you, and upon all your agencies and ministrations during the ensuing year, the favour and rich blessing of the Triune God.

CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH IN  
FRANCE AND SWITZERLAND, 1888,  
TO THE  
BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1888.

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HONOURED FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

Our Conference this year met in the midst of the mountains where the old Huguenots found a refuge, and whose caves were turned into temples of the living God.

We are happy to note amongst the people of to-day in the Cevennes, and especially amongst Methodists, something of the fervour and austerity of their fathers.

Our sittings have been remarkable for the deep importance of our deliberations. None of us ignore the gravity of our situation in this critical period of our history; but we will not yield to discouragement. Taking our stand on the faithfulness of our God, and on the promise given by Jesus to His own, that He would, through His Spirit, abide with them to the end, we are persuaded that the peaceful issue of our present trials will come through self-denial and zeal on our part, and we are resolved to present ourselves anew 'a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is our reasonable service.'

Already, during the last year, the trial we are passing through has produced blessed results.

With new purpose we have done earnest work; we have applied ourselves to preach the necessity of immediate conversion, and of 'holiness, without which no man' can 'see the Lord.'

By Circuit visitation, and special revival services, we have tried to revive our Churches, and to bring halting souls to a prompt and complete decision, and God has set His seal upon our efforts. We have had conversions in several places, and



in Paris, notably, Catholics have been brought to believe heartily in the Gospel. We have been led also to deal with the social questions, which are the burning questions of the day. In one of our chapels in the capital regular temperance meetings are held, where the Bible is the basis of social work. This new form of activity has brought us into contact with the poorest and most degraded of the working classes, and already some striking cases of change of life have rejoiced our hearts. By other means, for instance, through Burial Services, we have evangelized the masses with success.

On the other hand, we are happy to assure you that your desire to see our work extend through aggressive evangelistic activity, fully agrees with our desire to preach the Gospel everywhere and to all. We are giving satisfaction to this mutual desire. A Methodist Lay Agent, pious and able, has been employed in the large town of Nancy, and already his work, under the direction of our honoured President, is meeting with success. This year we are laying by part of the moneys necessary to found at an early date a new station in an important centre, whose population is almost exclusively Catholic. Our Conference has shown its firm resolve to develop the activity of the Churches in an evangelistic form. All our Circuits have been invited to undertake the employment of Lay-Agents (preachers, colporteurs, Bible-women, and Bible-readers), who will labour, with the aid and under the direction of our Ministers, in evangelizing the population at large in the places already occupied, and in further extending the area of Circuits. We have also taken measures to secure additional Local-preachers, and to develop the talents of our young people, in order to prepare recruits for our Ministry, and to set to work all the living energies of our Church.

Whilst we are striving to enlarge the limits of our field of labour, we are also aiming at a more strict organization within, so as to increase our strength. We have had this year solid proofs of the growing interest with which the Lay members of our representative sessions work for the progress of Methodism.

These valued co-labourers are in general very far from being rich in the goods of this world; but if their pecuniary help is necessarily limited, we feel we have their cordial co-operation in every work which tends to the building of the Church and the salvation of the world. We continue most earnestly to

educate our congregations in the art of giving, and a large proportion of our members do contribute to the work of God in a spirit of self-sacrifice.

We find another proof of progress in the fact that our Churches are more separate from other Churches, without being in any measure hostile to others. Many of our members are firmly attached to our doctrines and usages, and these are generally those who are most athirst for holiness, and whose zeal is most fervent.

Their love for our Church and their living piety increase the influence of Methodism on the country at large, and especially on French Protestantism. Besides our general and indirect influence, we find on every hand in the Reformed Churches men and women who have been trained to religious life and Christian activity by the efforts of the Methodist Church in France and in Switzerland.

Our care for our young people has borne, and is still bearing, precious fruit in our Sunday-schools, in our Bible-classes, and especially in the Children's Home, where we have seen most touching cases of conversion.

We cannot hide from ourselves the fact that in the near future we must expect difficulties and conflicts, but the influence of Methodism in France is more necessary than ever. That superstition revives, that infidelity and vice increase, are undoubted facts; and yet we are full of hope. We see upon the horizon the small cloud that must grow and shed abroad fruitful rain upon the vineyard of the Lord. On one special point the future appears encouraging. For the last twelve years vast countries in France were impoverished by agricultural blights, that brought whole populations into financial straits and even ruin. To-day deliverance seems nigh. Agriculture, the riches of our southern provinces, is in a fair way to recover its former prosperity. At all times scarcity and dearth have paralysed the life of Churches, whilst we believe material abundance to be favourable to ecclesiastic developments.

We are not unmindful of the numerous causes for humiliation, but the most serious of these is the decrease of our members. This does not arise from causes that need put us to shame. An act of discipline taken against a minister has brought on disaffection amongst the Churches in the Haute Marne, and caused their separation from our Body. On the



other hand, multiplication of sects, and the diffusion of grave errors in some of our stations, have taken from us a number of persons. We have had to go through this trial, but we believe it is now a thing of the past.

Our Algerian Mission is taking form; our Missionary is now settled in a village in the midst of the Rabyles.

The religious services held during Conference have been, as ever, a fine occasion to evangelize the populations of a vast extent of country. The sermons and meetings have excited a lively interest, and have been accompanied by blessings from above. The special subjects chosen for the occasion have made a deep impression, and will have lasting results.

We regretted the absence of the Rev. George W. Olver, B.A. The wise counsels he gave us on former occasions have always been profitable.

We have designated as our President for the ensuing year the Rev. William Cornforth, D.D., and respectfully ask you to ratify our choice. We have learned, with deep satisfaction, his nomination as Agent of the Missionary Committee in relation to our Conference. The high administrative qualifications of our honoured brother deserve our full confidence.

We have requested the Revs. Matthieu Lelièvre, D.D., and William Cornforth, D.D., to be our Representatives at your Conference in Camborne.

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REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,

We have received with joy your fraternal greeting, and welcomed your Representatives, the Rev. Dr. Cornforth and the Rev. Dr. Lelièvre. We listened with the deepest interest to your letter and to the eloquent address of Dr. Lelièvre.

We note with pleasure a fresh confession of the great practical doctrines of Methodism. You offer to men immediate salvation, and you insist on a holy life. It is by giving equal prominence to these two aspects of the Gospel that our Church has won its greatest triumphs.

An earnest spirit of aggression is one of the most hopeful features of our Church at home. All the methods approved by experience are employed with unwonted zeal, and we are discovering new modes of service. We are everywhere trying to adapt our methods to the changes which are taking place in the condition of society, and are directing our attention to the social evils which so profoundly affect morals and religion. We are thus striving to bring under the power of the Gospel the masses of our labouring population. It gives us joy to see that in all these respects you are moving with us, and that you have had great encouragement in the form of visible conversions. We hope you will abound more and more in your efforts to save the masses.

It is impossible at present to determine what will prove to be the best form of organization for a Methodist Church in France and Switzerland. Each nation has its special charac-

teristics, and Methodism has all the flexibility and power of adaptation, which are the marks of vigorous life. But we have increasing confidence in all the essential features of our Church, especially in the Class-meeting, with its opportunities of Christian fellowship and liberality. We are therefore glad to see that you are aiming at a stricter organization. Our experience perfectly agrees with yours; those who are most athirst for holiness, and whose zeal is most fervent, are most firmly attached to our ancient usages.

Another feature of our Church is to make the most of the gifts and graces of every member. You are mindful of this, and are seeking to train Local-preachers, to employ Bible women, to set the young to work, and to draw out all the energies of your laity. In this way you will make a practical and effective protest against the sacerdotalism which is all round you, and will reach very many who shun your public services.

We shall watch with special interest your Mission to Algeria. We are thankful you have resisted the very natural temptation of supposing that your own countrymen demand all your attention, and that the care of the heathen may be left to others. In this we discern another sign, that you are possessed by the true spirit of Methodism.

We congratulate you on the prospect of an increase of your resources from the renewed prosperity of your agriculture, which has been so long depressed. You are doing well to train your people in Christian liberality. We hope that your work may thus become in a larger measure self-supporting. You are aware of the financial embarrassments of our Missionary Committee, and will be glad to relieve them as far as possible.

Your brethren in England know how much there is to discourage you. They lament with you the decrease of your members, and deeply regret its causes. You need no assurance of their hearty sympathy and confidence. They recognise, and will continue to recognise, the strong claims which you have upon them. They are not impatiently expecting impossible results. Looking to you for zeal and faithfulness, they await with confident hope the unfolding of the Divine purposes.

Our President had much pleasure in receiving at the hands of your Editor and Representative the handsome volumes which contain the standard Sermons of John Wesley, translated into

French. The logical arrangement and lucidity, the precision, the force and the pure eloquence of those sermons, which your noble language is so capable of rendering, will recommend them to your countrymen. They embody the purest spirit of the Reformation, and will have a salutary influence on the Protestant Theology of France and Switzerland.

This Conference ratifies your choice, and appoints as your President the honoured brother whom you have designated, the Rev. Dr. Cornforth.

We feel more and more the glorious responsibilities of your position. You are dealing with the highest interests of a great nation in a critical period of its history. The place which France occupies in the political system of Europe, its influence on the intellect and taste of other nations, give special importance to all that is done for its conversion. And you have great advantages. To heal its wounds, and soothe its fever, France needs the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and there is no purer or more powerful form of it than Methodism. You have combined into a perfect harmony all the better elements of the rival systems. With the Catholic you hold those doctrines which elevate human nature and purify human life; with the parties which call themselves liberal you protest against superstition and assert the rights of conscience. You are not entangled by State connections or political attachments. You may expect, therefore, to have an increasing influence on the religious life of France. Many of your converts may go to other Churches, but they will carry with them a leaven of truth and zeal, which will continue to work. A firm confession of your Scriptural creed will rebuke the errors of the rationalistic school. You will thus raise the type of French Protestantism. Those who are wearied with the penances and outraged by the superstitions of the Roman Church, those who find no nourishment for the higher life in infidelity will, in larger numbers, turn to you. And in regenerated France you will have an honourable place.

Brethren, the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you all.

TO THE  
BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1888.

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HONOURED FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

We have entered upon the business of this our Sixth Annual Conference with mingled feelings of gratitude, anxiety and hope.

We gratefully recognise the hand of God which has been manifestly working with us in many departments of our labour. We are also grateful to you for the continued and repeated expression of your sympathy and approval.

But the anxieties attendant upon our position, arising from the peculiar nature of the work which we are attempting by God's help to do, together with the consciousness of the fact that with diminished resources we are undertaking increasing responsibilities, are resting upon us with oppressive weight.

In every department of our work, both English and Native, demands are made upon us for labour and help, which we find it impossible to meet. Yet our hope is in God, the God of our Fathers, and in His Name we are prepared with cheerful courage and renewed devotion to attempt whatever His Providence may indicate to be our duty.

Your Reply to our Address of last year, pervaded as it was by the spirit of affectionate sympathy, and manifesting so sincere an appreciation of our endeavours to lay a deep and solid foundation upon which may be built the future Methodism of this land, greatly cheered and encouraged us. We highly prize the relationship we are permitted to sustain to you, and are inspired thereby to emulate your zeal and success.

With devout gratitude to the Great Head of the Church, we record a Membership in our Societies of 4,079 English, and 21,764 Native; with 172 English and 8,911 Native members on Trial; and 464 English, and 3,136 Native, meeting in Junior Society-Classes, being a total increase for the year of persons meeting in Class, of 3,193.

Throughout the length and breadth of our Connexion our proclamation of the 'glad tidings of salvation' is welcomed wherever we go, and we rejoice to hope that the congregations which attend our Ministry are receiving 'with meekness the engrafted word, which is able to save' their 'souls.' Frequently has the Word preached been accompanied by signs following: the signs of penitence, of faith and of peace.

We note, with pleasure and hopefulness, the improvement which is evidently taking place in the educational attainments of the Native probationers for our Ministry. The firm determination of the Native ministers themselves, not to admit into the ranks of the Ministry those who are unqualified for the efficient discharge of its solemn duties, has our entire approval.

We greatly need, for Europeans in particular, a Theological Institution. One of our most profound regrets is that we do not at present see our way to the attainment of this most desirable object. It is one of the most imperative of the demands which arise from our position, and we may shortly be compelled to consider whether, even at the cost of abandoning some portion of our aggressive work, it will not be our duty to provide for this deficiency.

We have received into Full Connexion with our Conference four English and eight Native probationers, who have satisfied us as to their qualifications for the office and work of the Ministry, and we have received on trial one English and one Native candidate.

We have found it necessary, owing to the requirements of our work, to apply to you for a comparatively large number of young men willing to give themselves to our work in this country. The men we need must be of robust constitution, and of a ready mind, willing to adapt themselves to the varying conditions and seeming anomalies of colonial or heathen surroundings, and willing to spend and be spent for the glory of Christ, and the advancement of His truth. To such men we offer a sphere of usefulness of unparalleled interest and importance.

The important work of caring for the young is receiving continued attention from us, and enlisting the enlarged sympathies of our people. We have now in our Sunday Schools 1,895 Teachers and 20,852 Scholars, and in our Day Schools 373 Teachers and 16,477 Scholars.



Our Day School operations have been surrounded by increased difficulties, owing to the altered attitude of the Civil Government, especially towards the Native educational work under our care. In some instances interesting and promising Schools have, from necessity, been closed, and in many others the tax imposed upon the resources of our people by the diminution of Government Grants in Aid is very severely felt.

We are aiming at more thorough and definite Circuit organization where this is defective, but the elements of difficulty with which we have to contend make our progress in this direction slow and uncertain. We are nevertheless succeeding in our endeavours as fully as we could reasonably expect.

The administration of the Funds which you have placed at our disposal, together with the amounts raised in this country for Missionary objects, has caused us considerable perplexity, and taken up no small portion of our time.

The Union of Six Districts, hitherto financially independent of one another, and having various modes of procedure, and different estimates of the relative importance of the sections of our work, will necessarily require both time and patience. But this will be the more easily accomplished since we are animated by one Spirit, and are determined to 'look not every man on his own things, but every man also upon the things of others'

Our newly-formed Missionary Society has completed its first year at this Conference, and our review of its operations has caused us to look forward to the future with more hopeful anticipation. The Inaugural Meeting, held during the last Conference, at Kimberley, greatly exceeded our expectations. Since then the Ministerial Treasurer and the Secretary (being at the same time the President and Secretary of our Conference) have visited several Circuits and Mission Stations, and obtained largely increased donations and subscriptions to the funds of this Society, with the still greater advantage of a more intelligent and genuine interest in our Missionary operations. As one result of these efforts we have been able at this Conference to establish a Native Mission at the Diamond Fields, where thousands of Natives from the interior are constantly employed, and we have appointed to this Mission an experienced missionary, who has rendered heroic service in the 'high places of the field.' We have also been able to give special help to

the work in Pondoland, and amongst Kreli's people, and in other places, and we hope that by next Conference we may be in a position to establish fully-organized Missions in some of those places which are waiting for our entrance.

The great and important Temperance movement is rapidly gaining favour throughout our community. The evils of indulgence in intoxicants are not only great, but manifestly fatal. Not individuals only, but tribes and peoples are being destroyed by the pernicious habits which are fostered by the demoralizing facility with which these poisonous beverages may in many parts be procured. We do not hesitate to say that it is becoming the duty of every Christian man in this land and in the mother country to exercise all his influence, direct and indirect, to abolish that state of things by which we are almost everywhere surrounded.

The Natives of this land especially need the protection of the Christian Church against that greed of gain which does not hesitate to trample upon every moral and religious consideration which impedes its unhallowed course.

We are taking into careful consideration some suggested alterations in our Constitution and Modes of Procedure, which the necessities of our work are forcing upon our attention. But in such matters we feel it is our wisdom to make haste slowly, and seek for those indications of Divine Providence which are never denied to faithful prayer.

Toilsome and even dangerous as are the journeys which we undertake, and absent as we are for so long a period from spheres of labour which we love, we yet regard our annual assembling in Conference as all but essential to the harmonious and successful carrying on of our work; and we conclude our Sessions strengthened for future toil, and more than ever determined, by God's grace, to give ourselves to the work of our high calling, and to strive, both amongst heathen and civilized populations, 'to testify the Gospel of the grace of God,' and to spread Scriptural holiness throughout the land.

You will sympathise with us in the sorrow with which we report the removal from amongst us by death during the year, of no fewer than five of our esteemed and beloved Fathers and Brethren—John Edwards, George H. Green and Charles White, in a good old age, and in the maturity of Christian attainments; Richard Hayes and Henry M. Cameron, in the midst of their years, and while yet engaged in the blessed

activities of the Ministry which they loved. They lived blameless lives, and served our Connexion faithfully as good ministers of Jesus Christ. They have passed away from us, and, having served their 'generation by the will of God,' they 'sleep in Jesus' and are blest.

We thank you for acceding to our request, and appointing as our President for this year the Rev. Henry Tindall, whose aptitude for the position he has been called to fill has been manifested throughout the whole of the Sessions of our Conference, and who has gained in a higher degree than ever the love and esteem of his brethren.

We have nominated, according to rule, the Rev. J. Smith Spencer (the Secretary of our Conference, and of our Missionary Society) as our President for the year 1889. He has rendered most valuable service to our Connexion, especially in relation to the new duties and responsibilities which have come upon us since the formation of our Conference, and is a brother greatly beloved amongst us. We trust that this nomination will meet your approval, and that you will appoint him to this office.

We request you to receive as our Representatives the Revs. Philip Tearle, John W. Wood, and George Weaver, who will be able to give you interesting information concerning the progress of our work.

It was with very great satisfaction we learnt that the Rev. John Walton, M.A., who was our first President, and whose services to our South African Connexion we can never forget, had been called to occupy the high position of President of your Conference. Such an event, we rejoice to think, strengthens the loving ties that bind us to you.

We assure you of our loyal and loving interest in all that affects the Methodism of Great Britain, and we pray that to us and to you may be given needful wisdom and grace, that, fulfilling the purposes of our calling, we may secure at last the approval of our common Lord and Master.

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REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,

We heartily welcome your Annual Address, and the presence in our midst of the esteemed brethren your Representatives. The interchange of these fraternal greetings is among the pleasures of our annual assembly, and we beg to assure you of your continued interest in our regard and sympathy.

The record of faithful and successful labour which your Address presents, labour embracing such various objects and extending over so wide a field, is deeply gratifying to us. We share in the encouragement and hope which such a review may justly inspire, and our hearts are made glad by the thought that South African Methodism, though among the younger offshoots of the parent stem, is nevertheless a 'tree yielding fruit, whose seed is in itself' after its kind. Especially do we rejoice with you that the preaching of the Word is attended by 'signs following;' while these are with you—and, above all, if they increase and abound—all will be well; these should cheer you amid any difficulties, and be accepted as an ample compensation for any disadvantages.

We are not surprised that you should at times feel the pressure of such difficulties. The attempt to organize and extend a Christian Church in a young and imperfectly settled country must, in its very nature, involve strenuous effort and frequent perplexity, often rising to grave anxiety; while in your case there are complications, into the details of which we need not attempt to enter. But we thankfully remember that in other lands glorious victories have been vouchsafed to

patient faith and zealous labour. In many places, what was once but 'a handful of corn in the earth' now shakes 'like Lebanon,' and we thankfully anticipate a similar reward for your hallowed toils.

We would venture earnestly to remind you, and perhaps, more particularly, those under your care, that in many cases the very things which constitute your difficulties constitute also your opportunities. The greatest future results may depend upon the present faithfulness of individuals. A few scattered settlers, a single Christian household, nay, an individual believer, may, under God, lay the foundations of a Church which will prove a rich blessing in after years. Some humble servant of God, possessed of but few advantages, but 'faithful in few things,' may become a nursing-father or a nursing-mother to the cause of God. Personal fidelity constantly has its rich reward, perhaps, nowhere more surely and abundantly than in the opportunities presented by colonial life.

Most cordially do we reciprocate your sentiments of esteem for the Rev. John Walton, M.A., lately your President, and now our own honoured Ex-President, to you and to us 'a brother beloved.' A further proof of our regard and confidence has been given at the present Conference, in his election to the important office of Missionary Secretary. A faithful and laborious missionary, both in Ceylon and in Southern Africa, he will now help to guide and sustain the operations of our Missionary Society at their great centre.

It also affords us much pleasure to confirm the nomination you have made of the Rev. J. Smith Spencer as your President for the year 1889. Kindly memories of him are still entertained among us; and we doubt not that the energy and enterprise which he manifested in this country will also render you valuable service.

We hear with great satisfaction of the progress of your Missionary Society, and our hearts go out in fervent longing for its enlarged and continued success. The desire to extend the Kingdom of Christ into the 'regions beyond' is among the signs of spiritual life, and in any indifference to such endeavours is a sure indication of declining vitality.

'O that the world might taste and see  
The riches of His grace,'

has been—from the beginning—the aspiration of our Church.

We rejoice that in this most important respect you are following in the steps of men whose very names are a precious inheritance, and of whose labours South African Methodism is among the results. Our thoughts are turned back to the early days and struggles and triumphs of our own Missionary Society. May the same blessings that have crowned its endeavours rest also upon yours. We hope great things from a Mission among the Natives gathered at the Diamond Fields. Surely some of these will become witnesses for the Saviour, able to spread the message of redeeming love among their own countrymen.

We greatly sympathise with you in regard to the difficulties thrown in the way of your work among the Natives by the traffic in ardent spirits. It is, indeed, most humiliating, and even a cause for just indignation, that such temptations should come from the strong to the weak, at such a time and under such conditions. The only gleam of comfort we can find is, that the agents of so much mischief are in many instances not our own countrymen, nor even British subjects. You will not have failed to notice that our last Conference presented an Address on this subject to the Transvaal Government, and that memorials of a more general character have also been addressed to our own Government by our various District Meetings.

The addresses of your honoured representatives, the Rev. George Weaver and the Rev. Philip Tearle, in the Open Session of our Conference, greatly interested both ministers and people, and strengthened the hope which we have always cherished of a glorious future for Africa. We regretted the absence of the Rev. John W. Wood through domestic affliction, and the Secretary was instructed to convey to him the sympathy of the Conference.

For ourselves, the year now under review has been one of unbroken peace, with some measure of increased prosperity. The nett addition of 3,523 members to the number of our Society, though far from being an adequate return for the labour expended during the year, is, nevertheless, a distinct improvement upon several preceding years, and we humbly trust it may prove the precursor of yet greater successes. We are also able to report 32,235 on Trial for Church-Membership, and 57,100 young people meeting in Junior Society-Classes. We observe with the greatest satisfaction that in

this latter respect, also, your labours are bearing valuable fruit.

We share in the regret which you feel in announcing to us the deaths of the valued missionaries named in your Address; unfortunately the Obituary Notices which would have enabled us more adequately to recognise their services have not yet come into our possession.

Our ranks, like your own, have been thinned by death: forty-six brethren have during the year been called to their reward; familiar forms are missed from our assembly, and familiar voices are silent. Among these are the Rev. Benjamin Hellier, Governor of our Theological Institution at Headingley, and the Rev. John Harvard, for many years a faithful and highly esteemed Secretary to one of our most important Connexional Funds. Other brethren, though happily still spared to us, are compelled by advancing years to ask relief from the full responsibilities of ministerial life; among them are two Ex-Presidents: the Rev. William Arthur, M.A., and the Rev. Richard Roberts. The Rev. Ebenezer E. Jenkins, M.A., though no longer equal to the full duties of the office of Secretary, is happily able to retain an official connection with the Missionary Society as Honorary Secretary, where his long experience in the service of the Society, both at home and abroad, will enable him to render valued assistance. You will also learn with deep sympathy that the Rev. John Kilner, D.D., personally known and esteemed in your own Conference, is among the number of those who this year pass into retirement. Your prayers will be joined with ours that every blessing may rest upon the remaining years of these beloved and honoured fathers in our Church.

Such events remind us afresh that we, too, must 'work while it is day'; and, returning to our own posts of service, we earnestly entreat for your labours, and for our own, that Divine help which shall render them fruitful in good results, both at the present time and in the future.

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BELOVED FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

The encouraging and sympathetic words of your Reply to our first Address lie before us, and their influence rests upon heart and mind as we for the second time loyally and affectionately address that Church from which we ourselves have sprung.

Our many and absorbing occupations, our new enterprises, whilst they may tax our energies to the utmost, can never cause us to forget that God-honoured Church 'which is the mother of us all.' The respect, confidence and affection we feel for her compose 'a band of love, a threefold cord which never can be broke.'

Our former Address, in referring to our Conferential position, was of necessity limited to utterances of hope and desire. We have now tested the matter, and can, from a three years' experience, testify concerning facts as encouraging to us to record as it will be pleasing for you to read. The work of construction and adaptation has been and still is one demanding our most thoughtful planning, our most persistent labours. We have thought and laboured in fullest dependence upon the guidance and help of the Lord Jehovah, in Whom is everlasting strength. We doubt not that by His favouring care we shall be as marvellously aided as you have been, and that our West Indian Church, built on the pillars of a score of isles and the support of a mighty continent, shall endure until



the end shall come when the Church militant shall fully become the Church triumphant.

Fathers and Brethren, we have had our trials and difficulties, and our people have met them, not with the fretful petulance of immaturity, but with a calm courage, determined effort and unflinching faith, proving our Church worthy of the *toga virilis* you have bestowed upon us. Continued and very general commercial depression, hurricanes and pestilences have served only to bind our people more closely to God and one another; they have tested the mettle of our Spiritual manhood, and we are not ashamed of the result.

The unwearied zeal, the wise guidance and large-hearted catholicity of our beloved President, the Rev. George Sargeant, have helped us much, and we thank you for his re-appointment to his office in kindly deference to our earnest request.

Our Centenary Services have been held, and proved to all our Churches occasions for gratitude and incentives to fresh consecration to God. His Spirit has worked wondrously; hundreds, nay, thousands, have bowed before the crowned Christ in new-born heart-loyalty and allegiance, crying: 'O Lord, I will praise Thee: though Thou wast angry with me, Thine anger is turned away, and Thou comfortedst me!'

We gratefully acknowledge the labours of Rev. Alexander M'Aulay and his co-toiler Mr. Sampson, but our gratitude rises into devotion when we remember how the saving presence of the Holy Spirit was manifest in the services which they conducted. Pastors, workers, flocks have all been inspired and heartened; and many a servant of God has been enabled in fullest measure to cast himself upon 'the altar that sanctifieth the gift.'

We are thankful to report a membership of 44,501, an increase of 1,111, with 2,087 on trial. Our Junior Members number 6,005, an increase of 3,129; this latter increase is to us full of promise. The increases named have been general, belonging to both Conferences and to almost every section of each. We have many indications that the future will reveal to us still greater good.

True to the teaching and example of our parent Church, we have ever endeavoured to foster the intellectual life of our flocks; we are more than ever convinced that the religion of Christ should fashion the mind as well as 'purify the heart.' We believe that man's mind must grow in spiritual and other

knowledge just as his soul must grow in grace. The thoughtful aid afforded by your Annual Grants to Schools has enabled us to accomplish many things impossible without it, and our day-schools are second to none in efficiency and the production of good results. York Castle and Barbican by their successes in late examinations have proved to the public the efficiency of their working. The successes of York Castle have been kindly noticed by you. Coke College has made a promising commencement, and we augur well for its future. We regret that the government of Antigua has not up to the present entertained the application for having that island made an examination centre.

The working of our Theological Institutions at York Castle and Coke College, and the periodic examination of probationers in the subjects laid down in the *Minutes* of the Yearly Conference, are already producing excellent results. We regret, however, that the pressing claims of our work have up to the present prevented our candidates from remaining the full term of residence at our Institutions. We are pleased to report that we look for improvement in this matter, as the number of candidates for our Ministry is increasing. This year eight very promising young men have been received.

For some years the claims of our people settled on the Isthmus of Panama have been put before us. We were not deaf to the cry of our loyal Methodists, who, surrounded by abundant temptation, and not guarded by Church care, still kept true to our common Lord and His Church. We could only, in past years, give partial attention to our work in Panama—viz., by way of periodic visitation; but through the offer of one of our Jamaica brethren, the Rev. Alexander W. Geddes, we shall this year take up the Isthmus of Panama as a Mission Station in the fullest sense of the term, and the Gospel will be proclaimed not only to our Jamaica people settled there, but also to the people of the Spanish race. A vast field, from this as a starting-point, stretches before us. Millions of people to whom the Gospel of Christ is a dead letter, are ready for the proclaiming of 'Christ crucified . . . Christ the power of God, and the wisdom of God.' We have also this year put into practical form our previous intention with regard to St. Lucia. We have resolved to raise, by special subscription and collection, a fund for the maintenance of a minister in the above island at once. The President is empowered to correspond with a

minister who can speak French, and we hope to see the work commenced very shortly. The few stations we have in Haiti and San Domingo are places where the true light shineth; but while we rejoice in their light, they seem to reveal to us by very contrast the appalling darkness and semi-heathenism of the hundreds of thousands who dwell in the fruitful valleys of the interior, or in villages which nestle in luxuriant foliage on the swellings of the hills. The call of our faithful toilers is for help and prayer, and we fully intend, by God's help, to advance as soon as we can command means and men.

We very earnestly request you to re-appoint the Rev. George Sargeant as President for a third term. He has our fullest confidence and love, and we firmly believe his re-appointment will conserve the best interests of our West-Indian Methodism.

We have great pleasure in informing you that we have appointed the Rev. George Sykes and the Rev. Archibald Taylor to convey our fraternal greetings to you. These brethren are highly esteemed by us, and have our fullest confidence. They will be able to give you complete information concerning our work and people.

We pray not only as a matter of duty, but because we are moved by filial regard and sympathy, that the coming session of your Conference may be marked by special manifestations of the Divine favour and blessing.

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REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,

We have duly received the Address of your second General Conference, conveyed to us by your Representatives, the Rev. George Sykes and the Rev. Archibald Taylor, whom we were glad to welcome, and who informed us also, by the living voice, of your affairs. We were gratified by the evidences of your loyal and affectionate feeling towards us, and we assure you that the welfare of our youngest affiliated Conference is to us a matter of the deepest interest, and is remembered by us in our prayers.

We rejoice with you in the success of the newly-formed Conference, and in the prosperity of the Societies under its care. The increase which you report in your membership, the number admitted by you on trial, and the remarkable advance in your Junior Society-Classes fill us with thankfulness and hope. Such results are a testimony to us of your fidelity to Christian doctrine, and of your faith and patience in Christian activities. We are thankful that your English visitors, the Rev. Alexander M'Aulay and his friend, have given you such substantial help in the preaching of the Gospel and the up-building of the Church.

You, like other Christian Churches, have to tell of difficulty. We are able to sympathise with you in your trials, for some of them are ours too. In our Conference, though we have not to face the work of construction and consolidation, we are called

upon to surmount the perils of a period of adaptation and change. And in our Societies, though the property of our members has not been destroyed by hurricanes, nor their lives by pestilence, their means have been crippled by agricultural and commercial depression. The progress of the truth, however, does not depend upon temporal prosperity, and the Church of the living God will not be daunted by apparently adverse conditions. You and we will remember the Name of the Lord our God.

Difficulty has not paralyzed your energies. We are thankful to notice your valuable educational work, both in your Schools and in your Theological Institution. The importance of the religious education of your children, in relation to the future development of your Church, cannot be overestimated. Sensational methods for filling chapels and swelling returns of membership may have their temptations for you as for others. But this is a means upon which, when used with conscientious thoroughness and patience, the blessing of God always rests, and which must prove successful. Hardly less important is the training of those who are set apart to serve in the sacred Ministry of the Church. The earliest Methodist preaching was marked by accurate learning and scholastic culture, and these later times of anxious thought and enquiry are not days in which unlearned and unstable men should be permitted to wrest the Scriptures unto the Church's destruction.

Missionary work, we are glad to see, still claims a large share of your attention. You do well to remember first those of your own household, and to follow with Christian teaching and influences those who have left your shores for the Isthmus of Panama, who no doubt will be subjected to severe temptations in their new surroundings. We wish all success to the labours of the Rev. Alexander W. Geddes amongst your own and foreign peoples. We warmly approve of your determination to send a French-speaking minister to the Island of St. Lucia. Lay agents may have a work of their own to accomplish, but they can never supply the place and fulfil the duty of those set apart for the office and work of the Christian Ministry. May the abundant blessing of Him Who gives the commission and the promise of His presence rest upon all these enterprises.

We are glad to see that you intend to advance in other directions 'as soon as you can command ways and means.' Debt, even when incurred on behalf of Missions, is certainly

opposed to St. Paul's direction: 'Owe no man anything'; and Wesley's Rules on debt are applicable to Missionary Societies as well as to individuals. It is true that we in Great Britain have contracted a Missionary debt, but measures are already being devised for its removal, and we have good hopes that in a short time God's work will be freed from this encumbrance.

It may interest you to know that we have elected the Rev. John Walton, M.A., and the Rev. Marshall Hartley to fill the places of the Rev. Ebenezer E. Jenkins, M.A., and the Rev. John Kilner, D.D., who, to our great regret, have, through increasing years and infirmities, resigned their offices. The Honorary Secretary, the Rev. William Arthur, M.A., the eloquent Missionary advocate and powerful writer, retires from further service this year, and the prayers of Methodists everywhere will be offered on his behalf.

It gives us pleasure to re-appoint the Rev. George Sargeant as your President for a third term.

'And this,' we 'pray, that your love may abound yet more and more in knowledge and in all judgment; that ye may approve things that are excellent; that ye may be sincere and without offence till the day of Christ; being filled with the fruits of righteousness, which are by Jesus Christ, unto the glory and praise of God.'

THE ADDRESS  
OF THE  
FIFTH GENERAL CONFERENCE  
OF THE  
AUSTRALASIAN WESLEYAN-METHODIST  
CHURCH,  
TO THE  
BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1888.

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BELOVED FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

As we meet again in Conference, we are reminded of our obligations to our spiritual kinsfolk in the fatherland, and in accordance with a goodly custom we send you cordial greetings. In all that affects British Methodism we take a lively interest. We rejoice with you in your successes, and we sympathise with you in your anxieties. We are grateful for the steps taken for the maintenance of godly discipline and doctrinal faithfulness; we are also grateful for the movements in which Methodism, as a powerful evangelistic agency, appears to be renewing the vigour of its youth.

The methods you are employing to overtake the appalling spiritual needs of large cities, are watched by us with all the greater interest, inasmuch as the same grave problems are, in a measure, confronting us in these younger lands. Necessity is thrust upon us, as upon yourselves, to adapt our agencies to the changed conditions of our work in the large centres of population; and we are glad to be able to learn from you concerning the means which may be most successfully employed to reach with the Gospel not only those who need us, but those who need us most.

Another difficulty which we touch in common with yourselves relates to the conditions of Church-membership. No subject that has come before this Conference has given rise to more earnest and prolonged discussion. There has been the

heartiest unanimity concerning the great value of the Class-meeting as a means of grace, and not a wish has been expressed to depose it from the place of honour which it occupies among the spiritual agencies of the Methodist Church. At the same time it has been generally admitted that some regard is due to the many godly persons connected with our congregations, who, on various grounds, decline to avail themselves of the Class-meeting form of Church-fellowship. After a long and careful discussion of the case in all its bearings, it has been decided to remit the matter for further consideration to the Annual Conferences, which are to report to the next General Conference. This decision was largely influenced by the fact, that the same subject is now under discussion in the British Conference, and it is hoped that your own deliverance on the matter will be helpful to us in the conclusions we arrive at concerning one of the most important questions affecting our Church.

As you may suppose, one of the matters of unusual interest considered by us during this Conference relates to the unhappy division that has taken place in our Church in Tonga. The division that has been a cause of sorrow to universal Methodism has naturally been all the more keenly felt by us as directly responsible for the administration of affairs in the Friendly Islands. We have deeply mourned over the calamity that went far towards wrecking one of the most successful Missions of the Wesleyan Church, and earnest prayer has been offered that the Spirit of God might so move upon this Conference as to lead to the adoption of such measures as would tend to the healing of the disastrous breach. Unless we gravely misread the signs of the times, that prayer has been answered. As the result of earnest and prayerful deliberation, the Conference has decided upon a course of action in relation to Tonga that we believe has in it the promise of great good. The Rev. George Brown, who has done noble service in other parts of the mission field, has been appointed our Commissioner to Tonga, armed with authority to bring about, if possible, a reconciliation between the parties that are at variance. We have had your sympathies in the anxieties that have overtaken us in relation to Tonga, and we are sure that your prayers will join with ours that the Mission, on which Mr. Brown now goes forth, may be conducted to a successful issue.



As the Conference has met in the year in which is celebrated the centenary of European settlement in Australia, we have naturally been led to a review of the part which Methodism has sustained in the religious progress of these Colonies. We have lingered gratefully over the names of the pioneers of Methodism in the Southern World, and have been led afresh to give thanks to God for their faithfulness and courage, and for the success with which their labours have been crowned. With the rapid and marvellous development of settlement in these lands, it has been a matter of the utmost importance to follow the inrush of population with religious agencies. In meeting this vital need Methodism has borne no unworthy share. Among the sisterhood of the Churches in Australasia it occupies an honourable place, winning general respect and confidence by the part it sustains in contributing to the moral and religious welfare of the community.

You will be gratified to learn that a hopeful beginning has been made with the movement in the interest of higher education, to which special allusion was made in your last Address. The Queen's College, in affiliation to the Melbourne University, has been opened under the most auspicious circumstances; and the master, the Rev. Edward H. Sugden, B.A., B.Sc., has entered upon a sphere in which his special gifts bid fair to be of no small service to our Church.

We have appointed as our Representatives to your Conference, the Rev. Henry Bath, of Victoria, and the Rev. William Morley, of New Zealand. By the work they have accomplished in connection with Australasian Methodism both of our Representatives have earned a good degree, and they enjoy to the full the confidence of their brethren. They carry with them the heartiest commendations of this Conference, and we doubt not that you will receive them with the honour befitting their position as representing the Wesleyan Methodism of the Southern World.

The result of the review of our position and our needs is a deepened determination to devote ourselves more earnestly than ever to the attainment of the great spiritual ends for which Methodism has been called into existence. We cannot forget that Methodism had its birth in a revival of evangelical religion, and we stand pledged anew to do our share in the spread of Scriptural Holiness throughout the world. As a part of the great Methodist flock, spread out in various portions of

the earth, we join in the prayer, 'Let Thy work appear unto Thy servants, and Thy glory unto their children. And let the beauty of the Lord our God be upon us, and establish Thou the work of our hands upon us; yea, the work of our hands establish Thou it.'

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VENERABLE AND DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

Receive our cordial greeting in the name of the Lord Jesus. Your paternal and instructive Address from the Conference assembled in City Road Chapel, the mother sanctuary of Methodism, was duly presented by your esteemed Representative, the Rev. T. Bowman Stephenson, LL.D., and was received and listened to with deep attention, calling forth lively expressions of thankfulness to the great Head of the Church for your affectionate regard and deepening interest in the work committed to us. We fervently pray that the grace of which you remind us may dwell in us richly as it abounds in you. Your loving salutations were the more highly valued because they were brought to us by a messenger of the Church so well known to us, and so greatly beloved. The comprehensive and admirable report which Dr. Stephenson gave us of your Revival Missions, your Home and Foreign Missionary Work, and the new and great enterprises on which you are entering, greatly delighted us, while his eloquent pulpit ministrations, his judicious counsels and appreciative interest in our proceedings, have greatly endeared him to our hearts, and strengthened the links which bind us to the noble parent Church of Methodism.

Since our last letter was addressed to you from the Provisional General Conference at Belleville, the fruits of the blessed Union then consummated have become more and more developed. Not a discordant note has been heard throughout the consolidated Methodism of this Dominion.

The Lord of Peace has given us harmony, tranquillity and prosperity within our borders. The seal of the Divine approval has been most signally set upon this happy union in an increase of membership during the past three years of 27,676; so that we have now nearly 200,000 communicants, and our Church property is valued at about ten millions of dollars. With such an army of ministers, members and Christian workers, all that we need is the richer anointing of the Holy Ghost to go up and 'take possession of the land.' Our holy decision is to maintain pure and inviolate the principles of original Methodism, to be faithful to its holiest traditions, to preach the cardinal doctrines of our Theology, magnify the offices of the Holy Spirit and seek His richer baptism. We will keep the trust confided to our charge, so that no corruption of doctrine or neglect of discipline may rob us of our glory. Our primary vocation, our single and supreme work, is 'to spread Scriptural Holiness over this land.'

Upon our Missionary enterprises you cannot fail to look with the deepest solicitude. We are endeavouring, not only to diffuse the Gospel throughout the sparsely-settled portions of a territory extending from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and to bring the Indian tribes of the forest and the prairie from heathenism to Christianity, but also to bear our part in the evangelization of the world. Our Mission to Japan is among the most successful of modern Missions, and the prospect opening up before us in that Insular Empire is one that would gladden the heart of an apostle. Our work in the North-West, and on the Pacific coast, has so expanded that a new Conference has been organised, to be known as the 'British Columbia Conference.' The Educational Institutions of our Church are twelve in number, and they embrace two Universities, four Schools of Theology, four Ladies' Colleges, one Academy for boys, and three for both sexes. Victoria University is increasing in her efficiency and usefulness, and the number of her graduates is now about 2,000. In the matter of University Confederation it is necessary only to say here that by the liberality of the Government of Ontario, an important and comprehensive measure has been proposed which shall give, in a common or consolidated University, a higher culture in Science and Arts, and at the same time preserve those religious influences and safeguards so essential to an education based on Christian principles.

Believing such a scheme to be in harmony with the principles which we have so long cherished, the Conference, after a very able and protracted discussion, has expressed its approval of the plan of Federation, and has instructed the Board of Regents of Victoria University 'to take proper steps to give effect to such Federation at as early a period as due regard to existing interests, and to the necessary financial and other arrangements, shall render it practicable.'

Our Book-Room is in a most satisfactory condition, and our Methodist Literature in all its departments in a high state of efficiency. We have eight distinct Sunday School periodicals, meeting the varied requirements of our Schools, and giving wholesome religious reading to our scholars, who number one half of all the scholars attending the Protestant Sunday Schools of Canada.

The Lord has so given us the confidence of the people that about one-third of the premier Province of Ontario wait upon our Ministry. How vast are our responsibilities and how essential that the blessings of the Most High rest continually upon our Israel!

The sessions of our General Conference have been most spiritual and delightful, and our two General Superintendents, the Rev. Dr. Williams and the Rev. Dr. Carman, have been sustained in the arduous work of presiding over these important deliberations. Composed of an equal number of ministerial and lay delegates, we are yet one in heart and aim, one in faith and prayer and in labour.

Conservative of all that is vital and essential, we are seeking to make only such modifications of our Discipline as to secure greater elasticity in carrying on our work, endeavouring to mature and establish all the institutions and interests of the Church upon broad, deep and enduring foundations.

We have selected as our Representative to your venerable body our esteemed and beloved brother, the Rev. Charles Stewart, D.D., of the New Brunswick Conference, whom we commend to your esteem and confidence. He will convey to you further our sincere regards, and be able to inform you fully respecting our affairs.

Venerable Fathers, we sympathise with you in the sore bereavements which have befallen you. Princes and great men have fallen in your Israel. Death has been busy in our ranks, and men, almost as well known to you as to ourselves,

like the Rev. Samuel Dwight Rice, D.D., Rev. Principal Nelles, D.D., and Rev. Enoch Wood, D.D., have been removed from us. But while men die the Church lives. 'God buries His workmen but carries on His work'; and robing ourselves in the garments of the holy departed, we determine, more fully than ever, to follow those 'who through faith and patience inherit the promises.'

We rejoice in the vast and holy work which, by the Providence of God, has been committed to your care; and our fervent and continued prayer is that the God of Wisdom may guide you in all your deliberations, the God of Grace support you in all your labours, and the God of Peace make the Methodist people one all the world over.

TO THE  
GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST  
EPISCOPAL CHURCH  
IN THE  
UNITED STATES, 1888.

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REVEREND AND DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—

We duly received at the hands of your distinguished Representatives to our Conference in 1886, the Rev. Bishop Foss, D.D., LL.D., and the Rev. Albert S. Hunt, D.D., the Address of your last General Conference; and we gladly avail ourselves of the earliest opportunity of expressing to you our grateful appreciation, and our hearty and affectionate reciprocation, of your fraternal greetings.

Your Address, while bearing witness to the abundant harvests with which it has pleased God to reward your toil, is shadowed by the record of losses, which, were it not for your confidence in the promises of Him Who is 'Head over all,' might seem to be irreparable. The death of Bishop Simpson, one of the noblest sons of American Methodism: of Bishop Wiley, under circumstances so pathetic: and of other scarcely less illustrious men in the ranks both of the Ministry and the laity, of whom you have been bereaved since your last meeting, may well sadden your hearts. But, if 'cast down,' you are 'not destroyed.' Deprived of the presence, the counsel, the zealous co-operation of some of the foremost fathers of your Church, you inherit the inspiration of their example and the imperishable memorials of their faithful service: 'For their works do follow them.' We, too, sorrowing with you in your sorrows, yet not as those 'which have no hope,' have been

called to mourn over not a few 'which are asleep.' But, 'as sorrowful, yet alway rejoicing,' we are encouraged to a firmer reliance on Him Who is 'alive for evermore.'

The visit of your honoured Representatives will long be remembered by us with pleasure and thankfulness. By the stirring eloquence of their public addresses, and the impressiveness of their personal character, they fully sustained the traditions of the noble succession of men whom the Methodist Episcopal Church has accredited to our Conference as Fraternal Delegates. We were cheered by the testimony which they bore to the reality and the tenderness of the ties which bind the Methodism of the West to the Methodism of the land of Wesley, and also by the 'good tidings of good' which they were able to report from every part of the vast field of your labours. As we heard them 'speak in our tongues the wonderful works of God,' we were strengthened in the conviction that, in the order of God and by His blessing, the conversion of the world will be brought about through the zeal and devotion of the Anglo-Saxon race. May He hasten that blessed consummation!

When we last addressed you, you were preparing to celebrate the hundredth anniversary of your organization; and it was our pleasure to express to you our profound interest in the occasion, and our hope as to its successful issue. It is now our pleasure to congratulate you on the happy results of that commemoration, as seen not only in the noble sums of money which were raised for the wider development of your sacred enterprise, but in the quickened zeal of your Churches, and in the brightened prospect of a closer fellowship of those who in 'doctrine, liturgy and hymnology' are already one. From that memorable Conference at Baltimore in 1884 there gleams the promise of a glorious future.

Full of thankfulness to the Giver of all good, we congratulate you on the successful work which you are carrying on by means of your Church Extension Board, your Freedman's Aid Society, and your Board of Missions. The statistics of your success in these departments of your organisation illustrate the self-denying liberality of your people, and the self-sacrificing devotion of your ministers, who, while encountering the difficulties and perils, do not fail to reproduce the heroisms of the earlier enterprises of Western Methodism. The high standard which you have reached in your offerings to



your Foreign Mission Fund cannot fail to stimulate the zeal of the Churches at large.

We congratulate you, further, on the healthy growth and expansion of your serial and standard literature. Recognising the enormous power of the Press in your country, you have utilised it in the circulation of Christian intelligence, the illustration of Christian privilege, and the defence of Christian truth. By your earnest and repeated commendation of fresh enterprises, you have furnished one of the most potent antidotes to indifference and looseness of belief, for there is no such check to the progress of selfishness and error as the holy and well-directed industry of the consecrated life. We hear, too, with much satisfaction, that you are cherishing other projects, which, if not directly spiritual in their aim, are the natural outcome of that philanthropy which Inspiration represents as an attribute of God. If 'gifts of healings' are no longer the prerogative of the Church, she is not the less bound to avail herself of every opportunity of 'doing good.' The building of a hospital for the sick is an undertaking worthy of Methodism, and one which would have gladdened the heart of its founder. In this, as in every other department of your vast and varied enterprise, we pray that you may have the smile of God.

During the four years which have passed away since we last addressed you, our progress, though far from commensurate with the necessities of our mission and the expectations which we are warranted in cherishing, has been steady and hopeful. The long-continued depression of trade, the unwonted excitements of political and social life, the unresting activity of the apostles of error, and other influences which we need not indicate, have been prejudicial to our work. Yet our labour has not been in vain. 'Times of refreshing . . . from the presence of the Lord' have been vouchsafed to our fields of toil; and we have been specially cheered by the ready response of our people to the many claims which we have made on their liberality and devotion.

The number of full and accredited Church members reported to the Conference is 412,298, with 31,470 on trial. If Ireland, our Foreign Missions, and the Affiliated Conferences in France, South Africa and the West Indies be included, the total number of our members is 537,066, with 46,821 on trial. In addition, however, to those who are returned as 'full and

accredited Church members,' there are enrolled in the Junior Society-Classes under our care 52,855 members, with 31,470 on trial. These interesting Classes represent a very successful endeavour to attach our young people to the Church.

The state of our Sunday School work is encouraging ; we are able to report an increase which is full of promise. The total number of Sunday scholars in connection with Wesleyan Methodism in Great Britain is 895,532. Of these, 72,256 are members of Society, and 48,352 meet in Junior Society Classes. The number of teachers and officers employed in this work is 127,763, and the annual cost is a little more than £70,000. Our general educational work is not less hopeful. In our Primary Schools we have 178,152 scholars, with an increase which, in view of the rapid development of Public Board Schools, is not inconsiderable. In our Training Colleges for Day School teachers there are 227 students, of both sexes. We have established several efficient Schools and Colleges in order to meet the growing demand for Middle-class education, and we hope to extend our work in this direction. Our provision for Higher Education is at present limited, but it is thoroughly appreciated, and will, in all probability, continue to increase. We have four Theological Colleges for the training of candidates for our Ministry, with an average of about 250 students in residence. Nor do we neglect the orphan and the outcast. The several branches of the Children's Home and Orphanage are full and flourishing.

The statistics of our Temperance organizations bear witness to the energy with which this section of our work is cultivated. The number of members enrolled in our adult Temperance Societies, a number which by no means represents the actual proportion of total abstainers who are connected with us, is 27,087. In our Bands of Hope 322,071 children are enrolled. It is hoped that ere long one Sunday in the year will be set apart by all the Protestant Churches in Great Britain for sermons and special services in the interests of Temperance. This arrangement has already been adopted by all the Nonconformist Churches.

While cheered by many tokens of the Divine blessing on our work in distant lands, we regret that our resources are not equal to the persistent and pathetic claims which are made upon us from all quarters of the Mission Field. A vigorous policy of retrenchment in our expenditure enables us to

maintain our ground; but the severe strain of local efforts at home, and the profound financial depression which has prevailed throughout the country, have discouraged our endeavour to enter fully upon fresh spheres opened up to our agents. Yet the missionary spirit among us survives in full vigour; and many volunteers are prepared to go forth as labourers into the harvest, unto which the fields are already ripe.

The most notable feature of our work is a quickened interest throughout the country in every department of Home Missionary aggression. In order to meet, to some extent, the urgent claims of our large cities and towns, we have established Mission centres, with the special purpose of reaching those classes of the population which it has been found difficult, if not impossible, to attract to our ordinary services. An experiment is being made in the direction of short, bright and varied evangelistic services, supplemented by assiduous house to house visitation, and other appliances for raising the moral and social condition of the people. In thus adopting a certain elasticity of method, in order to accommodate our services to changing conditions and claims of social and religious life, we do not discredit, or propose in any sense to abandon 'the old paths.' Our faith in the ancient institutions of Methodism is not shaken. And though, in our anxiety to solve the very complex problems of the times, we somewhat vary our modes of aggression, we shall faithfully maintain the traditions of work and service with which the most fruitful eras of our history are identified. We need scarcely add that, in our revised and extended schemes of Home Missionary enterprise, we have not overlooked our villages.

We have peace in all our borders. Questions of Church polity, on which there may not be perfect unanimity, do not divide us; they rather bring into bolder relief the essential unity which pervades our ministers and people. We are giving special consideration to our mode of Church membership, with a view to its extension and consolidation, but with no idea of modifying its essential principle. We are studying the causes of decrease in our Societies, and are endeavouring to secure a greater uniformity in pastoral discipline. Believing that any attempt to promote organic union between the various sections of Methodism in this country, even if practicable, is not at present desirable, we are nevertheless seeking to lessen,

and if possible to prevent, any waste and friction in the actual working of the several Methodist bodies, and to discourage the needless multiplication of Methodist Chapels.

A large and influential Committee has been appointed to make the necessary arrangements, in conjunction with yourselves and others, for holding a second Œcumenical Conference in 1891, in the United States; and we hopefully anticipate results even more cheering than those which attended the memorable gathering in 1881.

We have appointed the Rev. Charles H. Kelly, who was for a long time connected with our work in the Army as Chaplain, and who now holds the office of Secretary of our Sunday School Union, as our Representative to your General Conference in New York. We thank you for the hearty welcome which you accorded to our Representatives in 1884, and for the generous estimate which you put upon their mission; and, mindful of the honour shown to them, and to all whom we have accredited to you, we commend to you our honoured and beloved brother, whom we charge to convey to you our loving and prayerful greetings.

'Now the God of peace, that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenant, make you perfect in every good work to do His will, working in you that which is well-pleasing in His sight, through Jesus Christ; to Whom be glory for ever and ever. Amen.'

### IV.—CONNEXIONAL SUNDAY-SCHOOL UNION.

#### 2, LUDGATE-CIRCUS BUILDINGS, LONDON, E.C.

The year has been one of prosperity in the Sunday Schools of Methodism, and in the work of the Union. A large number of conventions of teachers and officers have been held in various parts of the country with good results. There is reason to believe that systematic teaching of truth is extending. The literature of the Union is largely circulated. The trade of the Union during the year has been satisfactory, as appears from its financial reports. The Secretary has recently visited the United States of America in order to attend the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, as the Representative of the Conference; he was able to visit many schools in various cities, and ascertain the modes and methods of Sunday-school work in America.

There is much in the Sunday-school statistics to give great encourage-

ment; but one item, if considered alone, would cause regret. There is a decrease of Junior Society Members of 7,181. It is gratifying to report an increase of 8,466 in the Church Members including those on Trial. It is also of importance to note that the increase of Junior Class Members in the Connexion at large is 4,245. It is earnestly hoped that both the ordinary Classes and the Junior Society-Classes will continue to be worked vigorously, intelligently, and most prayerfully in all our Sunday-schools.

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#### APPENDIX IV.

#### ABSTRACT OF THE REPORT

OF

#### THE CHILDREN'S HOME AND ORPHANAGE.

IN some respects the year has been highly prosperous, but it has been overshadowed by some very painful bereavements. First and chief, the Committee must recognise with great pain and sorrow the loss occasioned to their enterprise by the sudden and lamented death of Mr. James Barlow, one of the General Treasurers, to which reference is made in the special resolution of the Conference.

The Committee have most gladly and thankfully accepted the proposal of an influential Local Committee to erect, on the Edgworth estate, a series of workshops, together with a model dairy and swimming bath, as a permanent memorial of the high public estimation of Mr. Barlow and his work.

The Committee have also had to mourn the loss during the year, by death, of the Rev. Dr. Evans, who for nearly ten years was their faithful and trusted Representative in Canada.

But for these sorrowful events, the history of the year presents only reasons for joy and congratulation. The income of the year shows no falling off, and this is the more remarkable when it is remembered that in the Jubilee year of Her Majesty so many claims of varying character were made upon the liberality of the public at large, and particularly that an appeal for a special Jubilee Fund of our own was during the year urged upon the attention of our friends and subscribers.

It has not been found possible to close the Jubilee account, but the substantial success of that appeal has been secured. One of the new houses contemplated by this fund is being completed, and it is hoped that in due time the other objects of the fund may also be satisfactorily accomplished.

The number of children maintained in the several homes has been slightly in excess of former years, and there is reason for great thankfulness that the moral and religious results have been during the year so encouraging.

The establishment of our Convalescent Homes at Ramsgate and Alverstoke, together with the increasing number of cases requiring special medical treatment, has suggested to the Committee the propriety of classifying differently these items of expenditure. With the development of a large work, having its several Branches, there must necessarily come special expenses of this character. Those expenses are necessary, not in the interest of any one, but of all the Branches, and it would seem therefore that they should be a charge upon the General Fund of the Institution, rather than upon any one Branch. Accordingly, the Hospital in London and the two Convalescent Homes—which receive children from all Branches,—will henceforth be a charge upon the General Fund of the Home.

The value of these developments in our system can scarcely be exaggerated. The fact that the children of the Homes must depend upon their physical strength for their future maintenance, renders it of the highest importance, to give them every chance to establish a sound and satisfactory physical condition. Their health is in fact their one fortune; and the Committee have no doubt that in doing all that is likely to confirm the physical well being of the children whilst in their charge, they will have the entire approval of their friends throughout the country.

The chief ground of anxiety to the Committee has been that the limitation of their funds compels them to refuse so many needy and distressing cases. Applications more numerous than in any previous year have poured in upon us, the vast majority of which deserve the most ready and sympathetic consideration. Only a proportion of these could be received, and the Committee would respectfully urge upon the friends of the Home that a steady increase of ordinary income is now, above all else, necessary.



The Committee would specially urge that very many Sunday Schools throughout the country which have not hitherto made a collection on behalf of the Home should do so once a year. The contributing Schools number now over 2,000, and the collections amount to more than £2,000; but there are many thousands of Schools that might make a collection, and if it were but a very small amount which each one of them gave, the total would enable the Committee safely and wisely to make a substantial increase in their work, and so meet a large number of painfully urgent applications, to which they are obliged now to give a negative.

On the whole, the Committee are confident that the work was never in a more healthy condition. Year by year a larger number of trained children are sent forth into the world, and satisfactory intelligence respecting their character and lives is constantly received.

## APPENDIX V.

ABSTRACT REPORT OF THE TEMPERANCE  
COMMITTEE

## TO THE CONFERENCE OF 1888.

WE report this year 3,344 Bands of Hope, with 339,065 enrolled members; an increase of 208 Bands and 16,994 members. There are 2,008 Bands organised according to Conference Rules, an increase of 121, and 12,069 members. The number of Bands connected with Sunday-Schools is 3,069, an increase of 169, with 316,046, an increase of 14,982. The number of irregular Bands managed by Wesleyan-Methodists, but not connected with Sunday Schools, is 249, an increase of 29, with a membership of 21,686, an increase of 3,559. The most interesting feature of these returns is the increasing number of Bands which are organised according to Conference Rules. We greatly rejoice that the yearly growth of our Band of Hope Membership indicates so much vitality and strength.

The returns of our Adult Temperance Societies are much larger than have ever been reported. There are 520 Societies with 32,389 members, an increase of 71 Societies, and 5,302 members. Of these Societies 250 are organized upon the Conference basis, an increase of 20, with 15,846 members, an increase of 370. It will be seen that more than half of the Temperance Societies reported, though meeting on Methodist Trust property, are not organized according to Conference Rules.

While the Committee rejoices at the manifest growth of Temperance work among us, it cannot regard this state of things as wholly satisfactory, inasmuch as it is evident that the tendency is to ignore the basis of our Conference Temperance Societies. At the same time, the Committee would welcome any means which could safely be adopted whereby the Temperance work done by Wesleyan-Methodists could be brought under review from year to year. The Committee is strongly convinced that by some method the Temperance workers and members of our Church should be reported in our Annual Schedule, without in any way attempting to divert their work from its present lines.

As suggested by the action of the Committee, and by the Circular issued by the Committee and signed by the President, nearly all the District Committees united in an earnest protest

against the Compensation Clauses of the Local Government Bill, and petitions were signed by the Chairmen of Districts, and forwarded to the members of Her Majesty's Government, praying that these Clauses might be dropped or so modified as not to compensate the manufacturers and sellers of Intoxicating Liquors from the pockets of the ratepayers. The Committee rejoices to know that these Clauses are not to be persevered with, and the Committee is unanimous and firm in its resolve to use all means consistent with our general polity and economy to prevent this or any future Government from granting such compensation.

The Committee has viewed with alarm and sorrow the persistent efforts made by civilised countries to introduce the sale of vile and pernicious spirits and Intoxicating Liquors, under Government sanction, into our Colonies and Dependencies, causing widespread ruin, and moral and physical disaster, among the native populations; and has united with the 'Central Committee for the Prevention of the Demoralization of the Native Races by the Liquor Traffic' to call the attention of the Imperial Parliament to this distressing subject.

3. WAYS AND MEANS. Receipts, including balance from last year, £16,314 2s. 7d.

(a) In this account is included the sum of £1,700 less legacy duty, £1,530, being the balance of the late Sir Francis Lycett's munificent gift of £50,000.

(b) The total ordinary Metropolitan Contributions amount to £1,435 13s. 8d.

(c) Provincial Fund. On account of this Fund a few contributions promised remain unpaid. The Committee will be glad to receive these at the earliest convenience of the donors.

(d) For the New Special Fund, founded by Sir W. M'Arthur, K.C.M.G., for smaller Chapels, there has been received £2,814 10s.

(e) Loans Fund. Repayments have been received amounting to £2,036 6s. 10d.

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APPENDIX VIII.

COMMON CASH.

DURING the year, by the direction of the last Conference, the General Account of the Children's Home has been included in the Common Cash; and this has been of considerable advantage to the Home, and of benefit to the Common Cash.

The Committee, at a meeting held on November 11th, 1887, out of a balance of £56 4s. 1d. then available for distribution, voted the sum of £20 towards the working expenses of the Office, leaving £36 4s. 1d. to be carried over to the next year.

Some of the Funds have had large debit balances during the greater part of the year; a few have had credit balances during the whole year.

From July 1st to July 29th, 1887, there was on the whole account a credit balance varying from £30,114 to £2,582, the average daily balance being £25,490, the deposit rate of interest being 1 per cent.

From July 30th to February 5th, 1888, there was a large debit balance, ranging from £141, on August 20th, to £39,112 on November 11th; the average daily balance being £21,498; the bank rate being, for the greater part of the time, 4 per cent.

From February 5th to June 30th there was again a credit balance; the highest on June 1st was £22,191, the lowest

on June 30th was £4,319; the average daily balance being £11,205. Deposit rate of interest, thirty-six days,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  per cent.; 140 days 1 per cent.

The total amount received in interest, including £82 4s. 5d. paid by the bank, has been £1,119 14s. 5d. The amount received by the Funds having credit balances, after paying to the bank £434 7s. 2d. has been £397 4s. The surplus balance on the year's working is £288 3s. 3d.; if to this be added £36 4s. 1d., the balance remaining last year, there will be available for distribution by the Committee at its first meeting after Conference the sum of £324 7s. 4d. It must be borne in mind that the surplus balance of £324 7s. 4d. by no means represents the saving to the Connexion by the Common Cash. Saving has been effected by the considerable reduction of the *Rest Balances*, by the fact that no Fund has had to pay more than bank rate for any over-drafts, and by the fact that a considerable portion of the interest has been paid to the Connexional Funds instead of to the bank.

The results of the year's working would have been more advantageous to the Connexional Funds but for the fact that our heaviest debit balances are at the time of the year when the bank rate is the highest, and our credit balances when the deposit rate is at the lowest point.

## APPENDIX IX.
