Q. IV What Ministers have DIED since the last Conference?

A. 1. In Great Britain, the thirty-three following :--

(1.) MARTIN YOUNG; who was born at Radstock, September 10th, 1813. From his birth his mother dedicated him to the Lord; and in the subsequent eareful training of her son she showed the sincerity of her purpose. His early life, though unstained by flagrant vice, was spent without the realisation of inward religion. At the age of twenty-one he went to Canada, as a land-surveyor, but on his arrival he changed his plans and established a school. There, far from home, and separated from his former associates, he reflected upon the counsels and prayers of his departed mother, turned with a broken heart to God, and found merey through the atoning Saviour. He at once joined himself to the Wesleyan-Methodist Society, and soon began to preach that truth to others which had made him free. At the outbreak of the Canadian rebellion he returned home, and opened a school at Faversham, which he conducted with success until he entered the ministry in 1841. After spending a short time in the home work, he was appointed to Jamaica, where he ministered with great acceptance and usefulness for eleven years. He then resumed the work in England, and continued in it till the Conference of 1868, when failing health compelled him to retire as a Supernumerary. He was eminently devout in spirit, and though extremely reserved in manner, his amiable disposition, uniform seriousness, and unimpeachable integrity, combined with a mature judgment, gained for him the affection and confidence of his brethren, as well as the esteem and respect of the people to whom he preached the Word of Life. He entered the ministry with a mind stored with general information, and being a diligent student in theology, became "a workman that needed not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the Word of Truth." His sermons, which indicated careful preparation and considerable mental ability, were characterised by powerful appeals to the conscience, manifesting his deep concern for the salvation of those to whom he preached. His few years of retirement were beelouded by great mental depression, arising from physical causes; but he never lost his hold upon the promises of God, or the blessed hope of eternal life. His end was very sudden. On the 23rd of September, 1872, he was abroad, attending to some matters of business, and retired to rest as usual, but before midnight his happy spirit had escaped to the Paradise of God. He died in the sixtieth year of his age, and the thirty-second of his ministry.

(2.) GEORGE TURNER (A); who was born at Norton, near Sheffield, in 1801. He was converted to God in his nineteenth year, entered the Wesleyan-Methodist ministry in 1824, and for forty-four years was uninterruptedly engaged in our full ministerial work. During his public life he was appointed, as Superintendent, to some of the most important of our Circuits, and was, at different times, Chairman of several Districts. He was profoundly attached to Wesleyan-Methodism, and was both a lucid expositor and an able defender of its principles; his pen was ever ready in behalf either of its polity or doctrine, and, on his retirement in 1868, the Conference addressed to him an official letter of thanks "for his efficient services in the spread and defence of Methodism." His personal character stood very An upright man, he spurned with indignation any high. approach to intrigue, dissimulation, or over-reaching. He was of a noble, transparent, unselfish, and confiding disposition; and while highly valuing the esteem and love of his brethren. amongst whom he made many warm friends, he was singularly free from ambition and the love of applause. His private life was to the end an example of cheerful piety and industry. His home-eharacter was lovely; affectionate and thoughtful, he was the light, as well as the head, of the household. As a preacher. the range of the topics on which he was wont to dwell was comprehensive, and adapted to the times. He was a thorough theologian: it was not his habit to turn aside from a subject because it required long-continued and profound thought, or from a text because it demanded much study and exact criticism. In the pulpit he pursued his theme with logical eorrectness and force; so that it was often an intellectual treat. as well as a spiritual feast, to hear him. He was not given impatiently to expect immediate visible results from his delivery of the Gospel message, but was content to wait trustfully when these seemed to tarry. As a pastor, he was attentive, judicious, and sympathizing; as a friend, his honour was always worthy of reliance, and his judgment of confidence. As an administrator of Connexional affairs, he was ealm, wise, and prudent; and in critical times showed great ability and dignity. As an author he excelled : his "Constitution and Discipline of Weslevan-Methodism," and his work on "The Divine Validity of Infant Baptism as Administered by Pouring or Sprinkling," are textbooks on these subjects. He was a valuable contributor to the "Wesleyan-Methodist Magazine," and other periodicals. His

logical method and luminous style were adapted to convince the reader. Mr. Turner's last days were such as became the close of a life so pure, useful, and honourable. He was afflicted with heart-disease; but his mind retained its vigour, while the ripening of the fruits of the Spirit within him became very evident. He keenly felt the deprivation when it was found necessary for him to cease from preaching. The fatal illness was short, and free from pain. His demeanour in his last hours was tranquil, reverent, and devout : he "endured, as seeing Him who is invisible," waiting patiently, with confidence in his Redeemer, till his change came. The last sentence he uttered was, "Let some one pray." As the prayer ended he responded, "Amen," and shortly afterwards his spirit quietly entered into rest. He died at Sunderland, September 28th, 1872, in the seventy-first year of his age, and the forty-ninth of his ministry.

(3.) JOSEPH LOWTHIAN; who was born at Renwick, in Cumberland, July 28th, 1799. The son of Methodist parents, he gave himself to God in very early life. A paper written by himself in reference to that period records many gracious visitations of the Holy Spirit, his delight in secret prayer, and his sense of God's favour. For a time, however, the influence of ungodly companions led him to incline to infidelity. But he was followed by Divine grace ; a sermon preached by his father induced him to go once more in sincere penitence to the cross of Christ, and he soon obtained a renewed assurance of God's pardoning love. Thenceforth his Christian course was unwavering; and though, from nervousness of temperament occasioned by long-continued bodily weakness, his religious experience was often less joyous than that of some others, he remained steadfast, and to the end enjoyed "peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ." Of his call to the ministry he had no doubt; to use his own words, "Every other path seemed blocked up." From his first appointment, which was to the Brecon Circuit in the year 1822, to the year 1860, when he was compelled by failure of health to become a Supernumerary, he continued a faithful and earnest preacher of the Gospel. When he could no longer perform the public work of the ministry, his diminishing strength was employed in leading classes, and in visiting members of the Society, especially the sick and aged. From such labours of love he only ceased when incapacitated by the illness which terminated in his death. For two months he lay in a state of complete physical prostration, but evidently enjoying settled tranquillity of mind. On the morning of October 17th, 1872, he finished his course so calmly that those who stood by could not tell the moment of his departure. Mr. Lowthian's preaching was characterised by unflinching fidelity to the saving

truths of God's Word, and by his enforcement of them upon the consciences of his hearers. But it is more particularly as a pastor that his memory will be cherished. His untiring diligence, his patience, his faithful yet tender warnings, and his gentle encouragements, won the reverence and love of those among whom he laboured; while his uniform Christian temper and conduct caused many, and especially his family and friends, to "glorify God in him." He died in the seventy-fourth year of his age, and the fifty-first of his ministry.

(4.) Edward Sumner; who was born at Epperstone, in the county of Nottingham. Under the careful training of his parents, the first Methodists of that village, he feared God from his youth, and was converted in his fourteenth year. Bv careful reading and close study he became a wise, able, and useful preacher of the Gospel. His sermons, which were expository and natural in their arrangement, were delivered with earnestness, and often closed with a pointed and telling application. As a Superintendent, he was prompt, methodical, gentle but yet firm. He was a steadfast friend and diligent pastor. paying great attention to young men who gave promise of future usefulness; several of whom remember his judicious hints and counsel, and kind encouragement and remonstrances. In all the relations of life he showed "uncorruptness, gravity, sincerity, sound speech that could not be condemned." His voice failing, he became a Supernumerary in 1851, residing in Madeley. But he still strove in various ways "to serve his generation by the will of God," interesting himself especially in promoting religious cducation. He projected, and ultimately completed, the "Fletcher Memorial School," at Madeley-Wood. For three years before his death his mind was beclouded, except at rare and brief intervals. When taken for death, he rallied for a moment, and said, in his former tones and voice, "Jesus !" and "God bless you." He then relapsed into unconsciousness, till he passed away to his eternal reward. He died November the 9th, 1872, in the eightieth year of his age, and the fifty-sixth of his ministry.

(5.) HENRY VYVAN OLVER; who was born at Launceston, April 30th, 1790. His musical taste and skill first brought him, whilst yet a child, into connection with Methodism. He early found the Saviour's grace, and entered upon His service. As a youth he was thoughtful and studious beyond his years. Whilst he busied himself with all knowledge for professional purposes, his daily delight was in the Word of God, and in such exposition of it as may be found in the writings of Mr. Wesley, Mr. Fletcher, and the older English divines. His knowledge of the Bible was remarkably full and exact. Having earned a good degree by diligence and usefulness in the Launceston Circuit, he

was summoned, with brief notice, to the ranks of the Methodist ministry by the Conference of 1812, and entered at once upon his work as a Home-Missionary minister in the Barnstaple Circuit. Marvellously preserved in 1814 from death at the hands of a mob at Rickmansworth, then in the Luton Circuit, he lived to preach the Gospel for more than fifty years. His labours were confined to the Western Districts of England. As a preacher, he was thoughtful, clear, evangelical, and earnest; and he loved to dwell upon the fulness and freeness of the Divine grace. As a pastor, he was diligent and systematic in both town and village; and his fidelity and sympathy endeared him to many. In temperament, he was keenly sensitive in the presence of circumstances either friendly or adverse; and thence arose many of his greatest enjoyments and of his sorest trials. In his unselfish devotion to his ministerial duties he never faltered. When, after forty-two years spent in the full work, he was no longer able to endure its responsibility, he continued to render willing and efficient service as a Supernumerary in the Banwell Circuit, where for twelve years he usually preached twice on the Sunday and occasionally on the week-day. In 1866 he removed to Redland, in the Clifton Circuit, where increasing infirmities soon closed his public labours. Notwithstanding intervals of acute suffering, he was daily cheered by the presence and favour of his Lord; until, with a full consciousness of his dependence upon Divine mercy through the one Atonement, and with a child-like, unquestioning confidence in the fatherly love of God, he painlessly "fell asleep" on Sunday, November 10th, 1872, in the eighty-third year of his age, and the sixty-first of his ministry. His was a long life, well spent and well ended.

(6.) JOHN JOSHUA PARKER; who was born at Cambridge, in January, 1850, and was made a partaker of saving grace when sixteen years of age. Constrained by the love of Christ, he soon began to call sinners to repentance; and having a deep conviction that it was his duty to go "far hence" to the heathen, offered himself for mission work. In 1870 he entered the Richmond branch of the Theological Institution; but his health not being considered sufficiently vigorous for labour in the foreign field, he was sent to Accrington, and at the following Conference to the Leigh Circuit. He was a young man of great promise. His earnest sermons, his fervent prayers, and godly conversation, produced in a short time an impression upon the minds of those who heard him which will not soon pass away. His one purpose was to win souls to Christ, and God gave him the desire of his heart. On the 27th of October he preached his last sermon, from "Watchman, what of the night ?" and those who listened to him on that occasion, felt that to him "the night" was near. He

sank rapidly, until, on the 25th of November, 1872, he fell asleep in Jesus, in the twenty-third year of his age, and the second of his ministry.

(7) WILLIAM SHAW (A); who was born at Glasgow, of Yorkshire parents, and died at Brixton, December 4th, 1872, in the seventy-fourth year of his age, and the fifty-third of his ministry. The greater part of his ministerial life was spent in South Africa, whither he was appointed to accompany the first English settlers in what is now called the Eastern Province of the Cape of Good About three years after his arrival, his labours were Hope. extended from these British residents to the natives of the country, among whom he established missions beyond the Colonial boundary. thus laving the foundations of Methodism in that part of the African Continent. In the extension and direction of the evangelizing work both within and beyond the colonies which were successively formed, he was actively occupied for more than thirty years; and to him, under God, its present prosperous condition is very largely owing. His steady, practical piety, his calmlyfervent zeal, his patience, prudence, and sagacity, eminently fitted him for the post of General Superintendent, which he held for twenty years, and secured him the confidence and respect of all classes of the community. On his return to England he spent ten years in important Circuits; and retired as a Supernumerary in 1869, still, however, continuing to render valuable service, especially in connection with the Missionary and Education departments. In the year 1865 he was, with much cordiality, chosen President of the Conference, his brethren being glad in this manner to show their esteem for his character, and their sense of the value of his services. It was manifest that his long absence from England had not impaired his fitness for office at home; and he showed himself an able and faithful administrator in the several posts he was called to fill. Few more truly valuable men have been found in the ranks of the Methodist ministry, and none have been more generally esteemed. Devout, benign, watchful, benevolent, wise in counsel, sober in thought and speech, all his excellencies were enhanced by an habitual modesty His declining years were happy, and his end was peaceful. His epitaph might be written in the words of Scripture, describing one of the first missionaries to the heathen, "He was a good man, and full of the Holy Ghost and of faith : and much people was added to the Lord."

(8.) THOMAS STEAD. This venerable man entered the ministry in the year 1812. He was born near Halifax, and received a good education. Soon after quitting school he became converted to God through the heart-stirring appeals of Methodist preachers. The late Dr., then Mr. Bunting, who was travelling in the Halifax Circuit at that time, perceived in the character of the young convert the promise of usefulness, and through his counsels and

influence, Mr. Stead was induced to offer himself for the ministry, His subsequent career justified the hopes of the Church. He became an able minister and a loved pastor in the important Circuits to which he was appointed. In the formation of his mind there was no preponderating gift, but a happy balance of good qualities. In all his duties, domestic and ministerial, he was an example of fidelity and a model of exactness. The long day of his life, as it began to set, was full of evening light. the latest hour he evinced the deepest interest in the work of God, especially as developed in the Church which he loved. The doctrines which had proved saving to him in his youth, and which he had well defended while his strength lasted, were the solace of his age. Resting safely and tranquilly in "the truth as it is in Jesus," he departed in great peace, December 6th, 1872. in the eighty-fourth year of his age, and the sixty-first of his ministry.

(9.) JOHN ROADHOUSE; who was born at Monkfryston. Yorkshire, September 20th, 1783. He was early a subject of religious impressions. Attending a Love-feast when about eighteen years of age, he found "peace in believing." He entered the ministry in the year 1808. His offer was refused by the District Committee on the ground of the feebleness of his health; but the demand for labourers exceeding the supply, the Conference appointed him to the Stafford Circuit, where, as in other places, his ministry was greatly owned of God in the conversion of sinners. In wide and laborious Circuits, and in some eases amidst strong opposition, he did the work of an evangelist with zeal and devotion, evincing the sincerity and strength of his religious convictions. By frequent and loud preaching he lost his voice, and after twenty-eight years of faithful service, was obliged to desist from travelling, and resume, to some extent, his worldly occu-He extrieated himself from business as soon as practipation. cable, and eventually settled in Leeds, where for many years he was a willing helper of the Circuit ministers. To Methodism he was ardently attached: he delighted in the society of his ministerial brethren, and was an earnest lover of good men. In old age and feebleness he was most exemplary in his attendance on the means of grace, and bore ready and frequent testimony to "the grace of God that bringeth salvation." Having outlived almost all his contemporaries, he died in peace, December 17th, 1872, in the ninetieth year of his age, and the sixty-fifth of his ministry.

(10.) JOHN GEDEN; who was born February 21st, 1793, at Lower Tysoe, in the eounty of Warwiek. He was the son of Methodist parents, and received a wise and holy training. He found peace with God after a prolonged period of Divine discipline and of painful spiritual conflict. For several years he

approved himself a true servant of Christ, by manifold labour and suffering as a village evangelist and shepherd of souls. In 1816. dreading the responsibilities of the ministry, yet compelled by stress of conscience to offer himself for it, he was accepted by the Conference, and the year following was sent to his first Circuit. in the Isle of Wight. From this time till he became a Supernumerary, in 1865, he discharged the duties of a Methodist minister, filling, as he advanced in life, some of the higher offices of the Connexion with exemplary diligence, fidelity, and pureness of Christian aim. His mind was robust, and in his carly course he took much pains to equip himself with theological and general knowledge. He invariably preached under a profound sense of the gravity of his vocation, and his sermons combined some of the best qualities of the Christian expositor, divine, and moralist. He was a conscientious and laborious pastor, and administered public affairs with conspicuous wisdom and judgment. His love of Methodism was only second to his inflexible loyalty to the Gospel. He was transparent, modest, upright, generous, knowing nothing of selfishness, conceit, or ambition. It was the simple purpose of his life to do the will of God, and to be meet for the eoming of the Master. Some years before his death his physical strength gave way, but his mind retained its force till within a very little of the end. Almost his last conscious act was a solemn ascription of "Glory to God for ever for the precious blood of Christ !" He died at Taunton, December 26th, 1872. in the eightieth year of his age, and the fifty-seventh of his ministry.

(11.) WILLIAM Fox; who was born at Attercliffe, near Sheffield, in the year 1806. When seventeen years of age he was deeply convinced of sin, and exercising faith in Christ, received the assurance of forgiveness by the Spirit of adoption. About two years afterwards he felt ealled of God to preach the Gospel. and in a little while entered our ministry, with a strong preference for mission work; but there being no opening at the time, he spent two years in Circuits at home, in one of which it is believed not fewer than a hundred persons were converted under his ministry in the course of a few weeks. In April, 1833, he sailed for Western Africa, where, for ten years, he laboured with great earnestness and success. He is remembered with much esteem by his brother missionaries as a zealous, persevering, and warm-hearted fellow-worker. After his return to this country he laboured in various English Circuits with much fervour and usefulness. As a preacher, he was sententious and pointed, and his sermons were delivered with great pathos and power. In prayer he had "power with God," and "prevailed." Through a severe illness he was obliged to become a Supernumerary at the last Conference. A violent cold, caught in December, hastened his

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end. His death was sudden, but peaceful. Some of his last words were the lines,—

" Fix'd on this ground will I remain," etc.; " Jesu, Lover of my soul," etc.

To his family he said, "Love the Lord, all of you." He died at Brettle-Lane, in the Stourbridge Circuit, December 28th, 1872, in the sixty-seventh year of his age, and the forty-second of his ministry.

(12.) JAMES DOHERTY; who was born at Tunstall, Staffordshire, in the year 1830. He was a subject of powerful religious influence in early life, and his eonversion, which was very marked. was followed by a life-eonsecration to God. His services as a Local-preacher were highly acceptable and useful; and, having passed through a course of training at Didsbury, he entered the ministry in the year 1855. His preaching, which always aimed at a faithful exposition of God's Word, derived interest from its originality and fluency, as well as from the Divine power with which it was attended. Of gentle disposition and retiring habits. he sought no prominence but that which the discharge of duty involved, yet he acquired the sincere respect of his hearers, and the deep affection of those who knew him elosely. A few years ago he was compelled by delieate health to retire for a season from the full work of the ministry. On his return to his beloved labour, he sought with increased earnestness to fulfil his course. The Master, however, had designed for him an early entrance into rest. His final illness was brief; but a few hours before his departure, he was able to declare himself resting upon Christ, and fully prepared for the great change. He has left behind him a testimony to the reality of his faith more valuable than even last words of victorious triumph,-the testimony of a consistent Christian life. He departed hence, at St. George's-in-the-East, on Monday, December 30th, 1872, in the forty-third year of his age, and the eighteenth of his ministry.

(13.) JOHN ISAAC MUFF, son of the late Rev. Isaae Muff; who was born at Burton-on-Trent, December 14th, 1816, and died at Slingsby, in the Malton Circuit, January 8th, 1873. He was converted to God during a graeious awakening among the boys at Woodhouse-Grove School. When eighteen years of age, he began to preach, and six years afterwards entered the ministry, the full duties of which he discharged with fidelity and success for twenty-nine years. Modest and retiring in disposition, he was a man of devout spirit, of blameless character, and of consistent life; highly esteemed by his brethren, and loved by all who knew him intimately. He was well-read in theology, and possessed a considerable fund of general information. His discourses, which were carefully prepared and earnestly delivered,

were evangelical, instructive, and practical. His attention to pastoral duties was marked by great diligence; his sympathizing spirit and gentle manners eminently fitting him for this work, and rendering his visits, especially to the sick and distressed, acceptable and beneficial. He was a judicious Superintendent, an affectionate colleague, and a faithful friend. Mr. Muff possessed an accurate and extensive acquaintance with the laws and usages of Wesleyan-Methodism, was strongly attached to its doctrines and discipline, and intensely loved his ministerial work. At the Conference of 1870, through failure of health, he became a Super-His affliction was of a most painful character, often numerary. causing severe suffering for hours together; but it was borne with unfailing patience and cheerful resignation : "the joy of the Lord" was his strength. His death came unexpectedly, but he was found ready. While seated in his chair, without a struggle or a sigh, he peacefully fell asleep in Jesus, in the fifty-seventh year of his age, and the thirty-second of his ministry.

(14.) THOMAS SHAW; who was born at Northwich, in the year Religious training, aided by a combination of favouring 1815. circumstances, lcd to his conversion to God when he was nine years of age. His good natural abilities having become greatly guickened by his experience of the new birth, he cultivated an ardent thirst for knowledge, and early began to exercise his gifts and graces in such spheres of Christian activity as were open to In his sixteenth year his name was placed upon the Localhim. preachers' Plan; and it soon was made evident to others as well as himself, that he was called of God to the work of the ministry. Conformably with this conviction he devoted his energies to the preaching of the Gospel. He was favoured with a collegiate course in Theology, and in the year 1842 was appointed to a Circuit; in which, as also in thirteen others successively assigned to him, he exercised an eminently awakening and edifying ministry, to which God gave many seals. He was a diligent pastor, and greatly endeared himself to the people of his charge. In the year 1570 he was appointed to the Buxton Circuit, where he continued to toil with unabated ardour until a few weeks before he was called to exchange mortality for life. Having been laid aside by a succession of colds, and harassed by much perplexity and reiterated sorrows, his vigorous frame began to give way; and although his medical attendant considered him out of danger, and he himself was confidently expecting to resume his beloved employment on the following Sunday, on January 14th, 1873, he sweetly breathed his spirit into the hands of his faithful Redeemer, in the fifty-eighth year of his age, and the thirty-third of his ministry.

(15.) WILLIAM LORD; who was born at Bacup, in Rossendale, May 11th, 1791. He was convinced of sin when a boy at school,

under the ministry of the Rev. William Edward Miller. Helped by the eounsels and prayers of his schoolfellow David Stoner, he found peace with God through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ. and heneeforth gave abiding evidence that he had become a "new creature" in Christ Jesus. He entered the ministry in 1811, and was early distinguished by his sound judgment, aptness to teach, and administrative gifts. Entrusted by his brethren with various duties involving great responsibility, he ably and faithfully fulfilled them. As Representative of the British Conference to the Conference of the Methodist Episeopal Church of the United States of America, and as President of the Canadian Conference for two successive years, he rendered important service, and his "ministrations, counsels, prudence, and personal saerifices" connected therewith, are still held in grateful remembrance. As Governor of Woodhouse-Grove School, a post which he held fifteen years, he took a fatherly interest in the sons of ministers committed to his eare, and enjoyed the confidence of the parents and the affection of the boys. By his untiring energy, he was mainly instrumental in the enlargement of the buildings, and in the general improvement of the premises. He was a man of guileless spirit and blameless conversation, -gentle, genial, and benevolent almost to excess. Throughout his ministerial life he was never known to throw off the harness unless disabled by affliction. On retiring from the full work of the ministry, he still preached Jesus with unabated zeal, and was a diligent and welcome pastor of the flock. When upwards of fourscore years of age, being pressed to prolong a visit to a son, he replied, "I must get to my work." His last affliction was brought on by exposure in visiting the siek. His sufferings were acute, but his patience was unfailing. In conversation he said, "No language can describe my sufferings;" and, with unwonted emphasis, he added, "I have peace, peace, peace, glorious peace; happiness, happiness!" His strength suddenly failing, he fell into heavy slumber, and by gentle and apparently unconscious steps "walked through the valley of the shadow of death," to emerge into the brightness and glory of his Saviour's presence. He finished his eourse at Manningham, January 20th, 1873, in the eighty-second year of his age, and the sixty-second of his ministry.

(16.) JESSE PILCHER; who was born at Ashford, in Kent, and eonverted in early life. He entered the ministry in 1831, and after labouring a short time at home, went to the West Indies, where he remained thirteen years. In addition to his ordinary work, he, in an emergency, rendered great service in conducting the erection of numerous mission-premises. Somewhat enfected by a tropical climate, he returned to this country, where with delight he again ministered the Word of Life. He was subsequently Superintendent of our Irish Missions and Schools, and General Superintendent of Missions in Natal. The remaining part of his time was spent in the home work. For nearly five years he was laid aside by affliction, and confined to his house; but he still endeavoured by his seasonable words to do good to all that visited him. He was an intelligent man, a charming companion, a patient sufferer, an exemplary Christian. As a divine, he was sound; as a minister, faithful; as a pastor, indefatigable. He died at Abergavenny, on the 23rd of January, 1873, in the sixty-sixth year of his age, and the forty-second of his ministry. After the seizure which proved fatal, he was not able to speak, but his general religious experience, as previously declared by himself, was expressed in the words—

" Not a cloud doth arise To darken the skies,

Or hide for one moment The Lord from mine eyes."

And with this, the testimony of those who knew him best fully accords.

(17.) WILLIAM SELLERS; who was born July 29th, 1831. From a child he had the fear of God before his eyes, and was a subject of the Spirit's strivings. He was converted in early life, being enabled to rely upon his Saviour, and rejoice in the pardoning mercy of God, when present at a class-meeting as a means of grace. He had more than average mental ability, and was of studious habits; the results of which were evident in efficient and acceptable pulpit-ministrations. In his last illness his sufferings were unusually severe, but were endured without a murmur; his patience bore testimony to the sustaining power of Divine grace. He died at Wantage, on the 31st of January, 1873, in the forty-second year of his age, and the fifteenth of his ministry.

(18.) SAMUEL BOWMAN; who was born at White-Abbey, near Carrickfergus, April 7th, 1815. His parents were godly Methodists, who brought him up in the "nurture and admonition of the Lord." He feared the Lord from his youth, and in very early life experienced the regenerating grace of God. While pursuing his studies at the University of Glasgow, he began to preach, and was called to the full work of the Christian ministry in 1837. His first Circuit was Truro, where his labours were greatly blessed to the conversion of sinners. He subsequently travelled in various parts of England and Scotland, and in every Circuit, it is believed, was instrumental in turning men from "darkness to light, and from the power of Satan unto God." He was a man of good natural ability, and of considerable attainments. As a preacher, he was clear and sound in doctrinal statements, fertile in illustration, and practical in aim; as a friend and pastor, he was tender, considerate, sympathizing, and

faithful. His constitution, never robust, was greatly enfeebled by severe attacks of illness, brought on by arduous toil and exposure in the earlier years of his ministry. After thirty-five years of faithful service, he became a Supernumerary at the last Conference, and retired to Gainsborough, where, after a few hours' illness, he exchanged mortality for life, on Saturday, March 8th, 1873, in the fifty-eighth year of his age, and the thirty-sixth of his ministry.

(19.) THOMAS JACKSON; who was born at Sancton, in Yorkshire, December 10th, 1783, and died near London, March 10th, This venerable minister entered on his probation in his 1873. twenty-first year, and died in his ninetieth, having maintained an unsullied reputation during the whole period. For twenty years he laboured in some of our most important Circuits; then for eighteen years as Editor of the Connexional publications; for the next nineteen he was a Theological Tutor, and during the last twelve he was a Supernumerary. His spotless character and high moral worth were based upon a sound conversion, and a rich, uniform, and growing experience of the love of God which is in Christ Jesus our Lord. His ministerial course presents a striking example of the value and importance of steady and conscientious labour. Without brilliant parts, and without educational advantages, he applied himself with all his heart to the improvement of such talents and opportunitics as were granted to him, and with the Lord's pound he gained ten pounds. He gave "attendance to reading, to exhortation, to teaching:" he "meditated on these things, he was wholly in them," guarding against all diversions from the great work of his life; and his profiting appeared unto all. He acquired vast stores of knowledge, but he never said "It is enough;" and continued to read, write, and meditate almost to the last day of his life. His preaching was sound, instructive, and adapted to general usefulness, though most distinguished by careful expo-He did not affect rhetorical ornament, but his appeals sition. to the conscience were direct and powerful, and bursts of pious emotion enlivened his discussions. He had the pen of a ready writer, and for nearly sixty years it was kept in constant exercise, his various productions being all devoted to the service of religion. The exposition and vindication of Methodist doctrine, experience, and discipline were his favourite themes; but his biographical and historical writings have been highly and justly appreciated. As a Tutor, he was affectionate, painstaking, and perspicuous, comprehensive and copious in the treatment of his topics, and unutterably anxious to secure and perpetuate sound doctrine. As Editor, he rendered valuable service by the labours bestowed not only to sustain our periodical literature, but to provide accurate and complete editions of our standard authors.

It is not surprising that his brethren delighted to do him honour, or that he should have been twice elected President of the Con-On the first of these occasions he was remarkably ference. sustained and blessed of God in guiding and animating the celebration of the Centenary of Methodism. His antiquarian researches contributed much to the interest and success of the movement, but his devout temper far more; making the several meetings which he attended means of grace never to be forgotten by those who listened to him, and bringing back those days of the Son of Man which he commemorated. On the second occasion his passive graces were as conspicuous. It was a time of severe trial, but while firm in upholding our discipline, he maintained a Christian temper towards opponents, sometimes under very trying circumstances. His old age was eminently beautiful. Always calm, cheerful, benign, often overflowing with kindness and love, he carried a happy influence wherever he went, and excited universal love and admiration, so that his hoary head was indeed a crown of glory. Death had no terrors for him. Being mercifully spared from heavy and long continued suffering, he may be said to have died of decay rather than disease; and, like Abraham, he went to his fathers in peace, and was buried in a good old age.

(20.) HUMPHREY STEVENSON; who was born at Bestwood-Park, Notts., October 1st, 1787 Blessed with pious parents. hc was converted in his boyhood, and appointed, while still a youth, leader of the class in which his mother was a member. Four years later he entered the Wesleyan ministry, and for thirty-nine years laboured in it with fidelity and success. He was a plain, sound, hard-working Methodist preacher. During twenty-seven years he was a Supernumerary, but to the last it was his joy to work in the Lord's vineyard. He delighted to meet his class, to visit the sick, and occasionally to preach. In advanced age he was characterised by great good sense, and a certain quaint humour. His life was blamcless, and he was strong in faith and charity; if he could not speak well of any, he refrained from speech. Full of peace himself, he took a bright view of the state and prospects of the Church. He was no believer in the degeneracy of modern Methodism. He held that the preachers of the present day, on the whole, were as able, and quite as faithful and zealous, and the people generally as consistent as when, seventy years ago, he began his work as a class-leader. During his last night on earth he was almost constantly praising God and singing. About four o'clock in the morning he wished the gas in his room to be put out, saving, "The day had come; it was all light around him." Four hours later he passed into that city the inhabitants of which "need no candle. neither light of the sun; for the Lord God giveth them

light: and they shall reign for ever and ever." He died at South-Shields, March 22nd, 1873, in the eighty-sixth year of his age, and the sixty-sixth of his ministry.

(21.) JAMES GODDEN; who was born at Marden, Kent, in the year 1812. From very early life he was conscious of the strivings of the Holy Spirit, and when about seventeen years of age was deeply convinced of sin under the ministry of the late Rev. Francis Collier, at Sittingbourne. On a Sabbath morning, while singing with the congregation the ninth hymn in our Hymn-Book, he was enabled to trust in Jesus for salvation. The following year he began to preach. In 1834 he was recommended from the Rochester Circuit as a candidate for our ministry, and accepted. During the next seventeen years, being favoured with uninterrupted health, he never failed to fulfil a Sabbath appointment. A genial Christian, he illustrated by his example what Mr. Wesley terms the "cheerfulness of faith." He was a diligent pastor, and a faithful and successful preacher. His discourses were characterised by originality and persuasiveness. In 1869 he was compelled, through entire failure of health, to become a Supernumerary. This was a source of great grief to him, for he intensely loved his ministerial work. As long as his strength permitted, he preached occasionally, and found much pleasure in conducting the weekly prayer-meeting at Hawkhurst, where he resided. His severe afflictions were borne with patient submission to the Divine will. The day before his death he exclaimed, "I am happier than ever I was." This good minister of Jesus Christ entered into rest on Sabbath evening, March 30th, 1873, in the sixty-first year of his age, and the thirtyninth of his ministry.

(22.) THOMAS BROTHWOOD; who was born in the neighbourhood of Wellington, Salop, in the year 1792. He was awakened to a sense of his sin and danger in early life, and soon afterwards, by a faith "of the operation of God," was "justified freely by His grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus." By the good providence of God he was removed to Dudley, where he was recognised by the venerable Joseph Sutcliffe, as one possessed of graces and gifts suited to our ministry; and by him was recommended as a candidate at the Conference of 1825. For thirty-two years he laboured in His preaching was distinguished by plainthe Itinerant work. ness of speech, sound doctrine, zeal, and fidelity; and the Lord crowned his labours with success. For nearly sixteen years he in the same spirit and manner discharged, as a Supernumerary, the duties of preacher and pastor in the Madeley and other Circuits. He was remarkable for his sincerity and uprightness; and was ardent in his attachments, affectionate in his disposition, and unwavering in his friendships. His last affliction was short, but very severe. He died in peace on Monday morning, April 7th, 1873, in the eighty-first year of his age, and the forty-eighth of his ministry.

(23.) THOMAS STOKES; who was born at Compton-Dando, in the Midsomer-Norton Circuit, on January 6th, 1846. His conversion to God, at the age of seventeen, was clear and welldefined, and from that period until he yielded up his spirit into the hands of God, his religious experience was deep, and his character exemplary. During a residence of three years at Didsbury, he was a diligent student, and the amiableness of his disposition caused him to be greatly loved. He was a man of sound judgment and real worth, and was eminently modest and self-distrustful. His sermons, which were chaste in composition, and full of evangelical truth, were always directed to the highest ends. When returning from an appointment in the Ludlow Circuit, in December, he caught a severe cold, which resulted in congestion of the lungs. After four months of great suffering, endured with much patience and resignation, he died, in the full triumph of faith, on the 18th of April, 1873, in the twenty-eighth year of his age, and the second of his ministry.

(24.) JACOB MORTON; who was born at Bradwell, Derbyshire, in August, 1818. His parents and grandparents were Methodists, and his pious mother's influence over him was most salutary and abiding. When about fifteen years of age he was converted to God, in a revival which took place at Sheffield in 1833-4. His conversion was immediately followed by determined efforts for mental culture, and every opportunity for study was diligently used. He was first employed in the service of the Church by the late Dr. Dixon, towards whom he always cherished a deep sense of obligation for his counsel and aid, and by whom he was proposed as a candidate for the ministry. Accepted as a probationer at the Conference of 1840, his great desire thenceforth was to be a faithful and successful Methodist preacher. In the various Circuits in which he laboured his ministry was owned of God, and he won the ardent affection of the people. As a preacher vigorous and thoughtful, as a Superintendent faithful and wise, as a colleague and friend trustworthy and kind, he was in high esteem with all who were associated with him. He delighted in the acquisition of knowledge, and a wide range of subjects occupied his attention. To the study of astronomy he was especially devoted, and when resident in the Bristol North Circuit he was admitted as a Fellow of the Royal Astronomical Society. His last Circuit was Exeter, on his appointment to which he became Chairman of the Exeter District, and in this capacity speedily gained the confidence and regard of all with whom he came into contact. His ministry here was most acceptable, and

the last services which he conducted were remarkable for the hallowed influence which attended them. His labours were brought most unexpectedly and painfully to a close. After an illness of four or five days, during which no danger was apprehended, he rapidly sank. Such was the effect of the disease from which he suffered, that no testimony of his Christian hope could be given on the last day of his life. Gently and peacefully, however, he passed to the presence of that Master whom he had served, and who had smiled on his labours. He died on Sunday, April 20th, 1873, in the fifty-fifth year of his age, and the thirtythird of his ministry.

(25.) THOMAS SHORT; who was born at South Killingholme. Lincolnshire, October 10th, 1799. He was converted to God when nineteen years of age. In 1825 he entered on the work of the Christian ministry, in which he was actively employed for thirty-nine years, occupying at times some of our more important Circuits. In 1864 he became a Supernumerary, residing first in Leeds, and subsequently at Brigg. His deportment was unaffectedly modest, and his habits were retiring. He was a hard student, had a high appreciation of the great truths of the Gospel, and was diligent and careful in preparation for the pulpit, so that he became an able minister of the New Testament. His ministry was acceptable, earnest, and effective. In the Circuits in which he laboured, he was much beloved, and his memory is affectionately cherished by many who were edified by his instructive ministrations. During his last affliction he was often exercised by strong pain, which he bore with exemplary patience, and his trust in the atonement of Christ was without the slightest misgiving. He died at Brigg, May 11th, 1873, in the sure hope of everlasting life through our Lord Jesus Christ, in the seventyfourth year of his age, and the forty-eighth of his ministry

(26.) SAMUEL HOPE WARDLEY; who was born at Peterborough, September 17th, 1810, and died at Colchester, May 11th, 1873. When quite a youth he left home for London, where, under faithful preaching, he received dcep religious impressions, but for a time relapsed into indifference. He afterwards removed to Ramsey, where his convictions of sin were renewed, and hc obtained the pardoning love of God. In 1830 he began to preach, and four years afterwards entered the ministry, in which he laboured in his several Circuits with great acceptance and success. In the pulpit he was earnest and thoroughly practical: his sermons were concise, well-arranged, and full of Gospel truth. As a Superintendent, hc was wise and able, and the impartial manner in which he discharged his duties won for him general His attachment to Methodism was most sincerc, and respect. in an unassuming manner he cheerfully rendered valuable service to the Connexion. While of a retiring disposition, he was amiable, consistent, and truly devout. His last illness, which was brief, but of a distressing nature, was borne with great fortitude and resignation. He longed for recovery, that he might do more work for God, but bowed with entire submission to the will of his Heavenly Father, exclaiming, "My times are in Thy hand." Some of his last expressions were, "I am an unprofitable servant, but Jesus died for me;" "All I can do is to rest upon Christ; I cast myself, with all my unworthiness upon Him." When the summons came, he was found ready, passing to his eternal rest in the sixty-third year of his age, and the thirty-

ninth of his ministry. (27) EVAN RICHARDS; who was born at Pwllheli, North Wales. May 13th, 1817 He was converted to God in his youth, and soon discovered talents for usefulness in the Church. His religion was genuine, and his mental character strong, earnest, and energetic. Having laboured for some time as a Localpreacher, with much acceptance, he offered himself as a candidate for the Itinerancy. In the year 1841 he commenced his course as a Wesleyan minister, and henceforth devoted all his energies to the fulfilment of his duties. He bestowed much labour and judgment on the preparation of his sermons, which were full of important, evangelical truth, and were delivered with earnestness and power. His constant aim was to win souls to Christ : for the welfare of the flocks committed to his care he was deeply concerned, and so taught and laboured that he might "present every man perfect in Christ Jesus." He was an ardent and faithful Methodist, and possessed a more than ordinary aptitude for the management of affairs relating to his sacred calling. For six years he was the Financial Secretary of the South Wales District, the functions of which office he discharged with fidelity and efficiency. He enjoyed the esteem and confidence of his brethren, as well as the people among whom he laboured; and by his removal the District has sustained a loss not easily repaired. For some years he was subject occasionally to severe pain and suffering, and his once strong and vigorous constitution gradually gave way. He continued, however, though sometimes with considerable difficulty, to preach till within a month of his death. His last illness, though not long, was severe, but his mind was graciously sustained, and he was calm and perfectly resigned to the Divine will. He declared several times that "death had no sting for him." To his wife he said, with a smiling countenance, "I am very happy. I have no fear of death." He died at Merthyr, on the anniversary of his birthday. May 13th, 1873, aged fifty-six, and in the thirty-second year of his ministry.

(28.) THOMAS DUNN; who was born at Aiskew, near Bedale, in 1793. He was converted to God in early youth. His compassion for the perishing souls of men prompted him to do all he could to save them. He entered the ministry in 1823, and for forty-two years discharged all its duties; and then, in comparative retirement, continued, so far as his strength permitted, most cheerfully to preach, and visit the sick and the classes. He possessed a clear and vigorous intellect, and was a diligent student and extensive reader. When stationed in Edinburgh, he attended the University classes, made considerable proficiency in Latin and Greek, and carried off the Hebrew prize of his class. He enjoyed at that time the privilege of studying under the late Dr. Chalmers. His piety, though not demonstrative, was sincere and ardent, its fervour being apparent in the power and unction of his social and public prayers. His character was unblemished; his disposition noble and disinterested. While modest in his estimate of himself, he was firm in the discharge of his official duties. In all the institutions of Methodism, and especially in its Foreign Missions, he took the liveliest interest, giving practical evidence of his sympathy by placing at its service nearly all his worldly substance. His preaching was earnest, practical, and successful; his one aim was to do good and win souls to Christ; and his fervour in the pulpit seemed to increase as his physical strength declined. He gave special prominence to the necessity of the Spirit's presence and power, and looked for present, visible fruit. At length the summons came, and found him waiting for his Lord. Having been confined to bed for a few weeks, during which his peace was uninterrupted, he gradually sank under the weakness of years, and entered on his eternal rest on the 18th of May, 1873, in the eightieth year of his age, and the fiftieth of his ministry.

(29.) JOHN MOORE; who was born near Newark, June 7th, He was brought up religiously by Methodist parents, 1824. and in his sixteenth year became a member of the Society. While engaged as tutor in a private school, he felt himself called to preach. He was sent into the work of the ministry by the Conference of 1846, and for twenty-seven years served the Church of Christ as a diligent pastor and earnest preacher of the Gospel. Before offering himself as a candidate, Mr. Moore spent two academical years in attendance on the lectures of Sir William Hamilton, in Edinburgh. This course of study impressed its stamp on his whole career; it awakened and stimulated faculties of a high order, and gave him the benefit of a discipline which prepared him for the peculiar services he afterwards rendered to the cause of truth. As a faithful, but not servile, expositor of Hamilton's philosophy, he was well able to point out both its strength and its weakness in relation to the fundamental principles of Christianity. About the same time he came under the influence of another gifted mind, of a very different order. Mr.

Finney, of America, both by personal converse and by his writings, largely contributed to mould his habits of thinking and preaching. The combination of these distinct and, in some respects, opposite influences, gave a peculiar character to Mr. Moore's ministry, especially in its earlier years. His definitions and phrascology in general seemed sometimes to diverge from the standard of Methodist theology: only seemed, however, for he was perfectly sound in the essentials. His preaching also exhibited a union of metaphysical subtlety with revivalist ardour, which is rarely to be found. Mr. Moore's highest joy on earth was to win souls; and, that he might win them, as the instrument of the Holy Ghost, he deeply studied the secrets of the spirit in man. Toward the latter part of his life, he felt himself called to investigate some of those problems which arise in the border-land between philosophy and theology. The result remains with us in the form of essays, which, though only fragmentary in relation to what he projected, are full of wise and invigorating suggestion. In the midst of his deeply-laid plans for usefulness, his strength was prostrated by an internal disease which baffled his medical advisers. He partially retired in 1871; and, while earnestly hoping to live, prepared to die. His summons came suddenly at the last, and he departed in great peace on June 5th, 1873, within two days of entering on his fiftieth year, and in the twenty-seventh of his ministry. Mr. Moore has left a precious memory. He was a pure-minded man, ruled by one purpose; he was a zealous preacher of the Gospel; hc was a good theologian, though the concentration of his mind on philosophy limited, perhaps unduly, the range of his reading; he was, in fine, a faithful servant of the Lord Jesus Christ, who accomplished much in his comparatively short career.

(30.) FREDERICK GRIFFITHS; who was a native of Broadway, in Worcestershire. He had not the advantage of godly parental training, and his early years were spent in indifference to his soul's welfare. At length the Holy Spirit aroused him. He had gone to a Methodist meeting, along with other young men, to ridicule and disturb those assembled; but conviction of his own guilt and danger seized him while there, and he sought and found peace with God. Ere long he was constrained by the love of Christ to preach; and he did this with so much energy and zeal. that he was called "the young madman," and was followed by crowds, many of whom yielded to the power of the truth. Kindred and friends would have dissuaded him, but he felt that his life-work must be in serving as an "ambassador for Christ." He entered the ministry in 1836, and for many years laboured in some of our principal Circuits. His preaching was attractive and powerful, being especially useful in awakening sinners and leading them to the Cross. With a strong, yet not

harsh or unmelodious voice, a vigorous physical frame, and a lively imagination, he had many of the natural qualifications of an orator; and these were devoted to the Lord Jesus, and fused with holy fervour. His sermons were carefully prepared; and if profound or far-reaching views of truth, nice analysis of the human heart, or full Scriptural exposition, could not be claimed for them, they nevertheless were most impressive. His bold and impassioned appeals went to the conscience and the heart, and often were numbers brought then and there to decide for God and heaven. His last illness, which extended over some months, depressed him so much that he shrank from conversation; and when the end drew nigh, he for days took little notice of those who were near, or of what was said and done. Once, however, when a colleague was praying by his bedside, and quoted our Lord's words, "I give unto My sheep eternal life, and they shall never perish," the stricken man exclaimed, in his old earnest way, "Praise God!" He doubtless shines among them that were "wise," and turned "many to righteousness." He fell asleep on June 21st, 1873, in the sixty-fifth year of his age.

(31.) JOHN GOSTICK; who was a son of the late Rev. Joseph Gostick, and was born at Dover, March 14th, 1820. He feared the Lord from his youth, and at the age of about fifteen years was made painfully conscious of the necessity of an inward Through the ministry of the late Rev. John Anderson, change. he became truly penitent, and soon afterwards was able to trust in the atonement of Christ for salvation. He now earnestly devoted himself to the work of the Church, and gave, thus early, promise of those gifts and graces which were subsequently developed in his ministerial life. He was received by the Conference as a preacher on trial in 1839, and for four years laboured in home Circuits. In 1843 he devoted himself to our mission work in India, and his brief sojourn in Coonghul-cut short by domestic affliction - was ever afterwards to him a "sunny After his return to England he was appointed to memory." several of our most important Circuits, in each of which he laboured with great acceptance for the full term of three years. His sermons were polished in style, rich in thought, truly evangelical, and highly instructive. As a platform-speaker his genius was of a high order : the originality of his thoughts, the chasteness of his language, the beauty of his imagery, and the exquisite humour with which the whole was interspersed, enchained attention and gave interest to all hc said. But his favouritc theme was India: the extent of the country, the vastness of the population, their languages, superstitions, and philosophies, what the Church had done, and what she ought to do, the difficulties, slow progress, and ultimate triumph of Christianity, were topics which he handled in a masterly manner equalled by few. In his pastoral

duties he was exemplary, and as a colleague was faithful. His last affliction, which was brief but severe, was borne with cheerful resignation to the will of God; and, throughout, his peace of mind was perfect and unbroken. A few days before his death some of his words were, "I have peace, like the great deep, profound!" And just before his decease he said, "I have great quiet, great rest!" On the same evening he was heard to utter the words, "The Promised Land;" but he was too much exhausted to make himself distinctly understood. Soon afterwards, without any visible sign of dying, his spirit returned to God who gave it. He died on Sunday, June 22nd, 1873, in the fiftyfourth year of his age, and the thirty-fourth of his ministry.

(32.) EDWARD CROFTS; who was born near Stamford, in the year 1817 He did not enjoy the advantages of a religious training, but, under Methodist preaching, he was converted to God in his youth, and at once united himself to our branch of the Christian Church. Having been employed as a Local-preacher in the Stamford Circuit for some time, in which capacity he was both popular and useful, he was called to the Itinerant ministry, and was received into the Theological Institution at Hoxton. In 1839 he was appointed to a Circuit, and became a diligent and devoted pastor. He was of a nervous temperament, and had at all times very humble views of himself. On one occasion, when brought apparently near to death, although fully assured of the Divine favour and of his personal safety, the thought that he had done so little for his Saviour caused him deep distress of mind. His sermons, which were carefully prepared, were delivered with great earnestness; and one of his former colleagues says, "From many testimonies that I received when I was with him, his preaching was attended with much spiritual profit to his hearers." Though of feeble health, he seldom would omit any portion of his work, and often preached in large chapels when evidently suffering bodily pain. He was compelled to retire from active service for a time in 1858, and ultimately became a Supernumerary in 1870. His departure was comparatively sudden. He had a dread of a prolonged struggle with death, and God mercifully delivered him from that which he feared. An attack of hemorrhage of the lungs almost instantaneously removed him, with the prayer on his lips, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit!" He died at Manorbear, near Tenby, on July 2nd, 1873, in the fifty-sixth year of his age, and the thirty-fourth of his ministry.

(33.) LOT HUGHES; who was born at Abergele, North Wales. He was among the early fruits of Welsh Methodism in the Principality, and was converted to God when about fifteen years of age. In his nineteenth year he began to preach, and soon afterwards was called to the full work of the ministry. His educational advantages were few, but by diligent application he greatly improved his mental powers, so as to become a very acceptable and useful minister. During his long course of labour he was eminently successful in winning souls to Christ, always proving himself to be a wise, painstaking Superintendent, and a most diligent pastor. He was remarkably methodical and punctual in the discharge of all his ministerial duties. His health failed in 1850, when he became a Supernumerary. In his comparative retirement he retained his mental faculties and usual cheerfulness, taking to the last a great interest in the prosperity of the work of God. His leisure hours were latterly employed in writing historical sketches of the Rise and Progress of Methodism in the Principality, which were published monthly in the Welsh Magazine. His death was sudden. On a Saturday evening he retired to rest, apparently in better health than he had been for some time, but in the morning it was found that his spirit had taken its flight to the heavenly mansions. He died July 13th, 1873, in the cighty-seventh year of his agc, and the sixty-fifth of his ministry.

2. In Ireland, four; viz.,—

(1.) DANIEL MACAFEE; who died in London, January 11th. 1873, in the eighty-second year of his age, and the forty-sixth of his ministry. Born at Bushmills, in the county of Antrim, like Dr. Adam Clarke and Mr. Waugh, he was connected with the Coleraine Circuit. He was designed by his parents for the ministry of the Reformed Presbyterian Church, but, through the influence of a pious class-leader in the town of Coleraine, was induced frequently to attend the Methodist ministry. The preaching of the Rev. Matthew Tobias was made specially useful to him. At the age of fourteen he joined the Society, and sought a sense of his acceptance with God, until at length he found it. He first offered himself for the ministry among us, but, economical arrangements preventing his admission, he laboured for some years among the "Primitive" Wesleyans. In 1827, however, he was accepted by the Conference; and, from that time, held a high position in the Irish Connexion, and an acknowledged rank among the leading preachers and theologians in the country. In most important centres of religious and intellectual activity, his ministry was not only felt by our own people to be commanding and fruitful, but was valued by the whole Protestant community as mighty in the defence of the Reformed faith, and of the Godhead and Atonement of Christ, as well as in sound exposition of the way of salvation. His mind was naturally acute and vigorous, and his powers of reasoning, cultivated by metaphysical and mathematical studics, were applied with manly zeal to grapple with the errors of Romanism and of Rationalism which

assail or obscure the fundamental verities of the Gospel. But even more than in confuting such errors, his abilities were exercised in displaying, illustrating, and enforcing the glorious truths of Gospel grace; which he would present in demonstration so clear, and with influence so impressive, as sometimes to elicit from his hearers involuntary expressions of assent and delight. In controversy he wielded a ready and incisive pen. Some of his publications attracted the notice of the entire country: and a permanent record of his skill and depth as a preacher remains in his published sermons. For several years after he became a Supernumerary he resided in London. There, in his last illness, he testified to the grace of God which had long sustained and did not fail him in the final hour. He solemnly said that in whatever circumstances he had been placed, he never had kept back the truth, but had fearlessly declared it. And when a friend said, "Goodness and mcrcy have followed me all the days of my life," hc added, with strong emphasis, "And I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever." Speaking of the comfort he had derived from the exposition of the Gospel contained in the tenth chapter of the Epistle to the Romans, he repeated without one mistake the first ten verses, and added, "Is not that an easy plan of salvation ?" With the intellectual vigour which gained for him such a considerable reputation, and with the extensive reading by which it was fed and disciplined, he combined great simplicity and openness, uprightness of purpose, vivacity and warm-heartedness in private life, and guileless generosity as a friend. He was one of those remarkable men who deeply engrave their own memorial upon the mind of the community in which they live, and of whom, when departed, it is felt that the impression made in life was not due to factitious displays, but to sterling talents, and to services of permanent value.

(2.) WILLIAM HOEY (A); who was born of godly parents, near Brookborough, March 4th, 1808. Hc was the youngest of six sons, who were carly left to the care of their widowed mother, and by her trained in the fear of God, and in attendance on Methodist ordinances. When about sixteen years of age, he was convinced of sin under a sermon preached by the Rev. John Armstrong, and shortly afterwards at a prayer-meeting found peace through believing. Having exercised his gifts as a Leader and Local-preacher, hc was called into the Itinerant work in 1831. By successive attacks of cholera and fever in the first years of his ministry, his constitution was considerably shaken and impaired. He nevertheless travelled with fidelity and acceptance in several of our most laborious Circuits, never sparing himself, sick or well, when God's work was to be done; and in some of them hc witnessed gracious revivals of religion.

the Lord blessing his labours in the conversion of many souls. At the Conference of 1864, he was obliged to retire as a Supernumerary, but continued to serve the Church, so far as his health would permit, up to the Sabbath before his death, when hc His end was sudden, but peaceful. During preached twice. the week his strength declined, on Saturday he was seized with paralysis of the brain, and on the following day entered into the joy of his Lord. Shortly before he became insensible, on being asked, "Is God with you?" he smiled, and said, "He has been a long time with me, and He will never leave me now." Mr. Hoey was a man of a quiet, patient, and cheerful spirit, an unselfish disposition, unobtrusive and retiring habits, and one who secured respect and affection in the relations of domestic life. His preaching was clear, practical, and persuasive; and he was esteemed and beloved as a genial colleague, and a faithful pastor and friend. He died on the 16th of March, 1873, in the sixty-sixth year of his age, and the forty-second of his ministry.

(3.) ROBERT BEAUCHAMP; who was born in Limerick, April 28th, 1798, and died in London, April 28th, 1873, having just completed his seventy-fifth year. By descent he was honourably connected with Methodism in Ireland, some of his ancestors being mentioned by Mr. Wesley in his Journal. Early in life he lost his excellent mother, whose sudden death, however, led to his personal conversion. He entered the ministry in 1824, and for thirty-nine years faithfully discharged its sacred duties. A few years before his dcath he removed to England, where he resided, first at Newark, and afterwards in London. He was a man who combined a pleasing gentleness of manner with great firmness of purpose. He was remarkable for a reverent piety of spirit and an unswerving consistency of life, which could only have had their foundation in deep and sustained communion with As a minister, he was studious in his habits, enriching his God. mind by useful and extensive reading; and yet he was very diligent in the conscientious discharge of pastoral duties, visiting from house to house, and carefully instructing the children and youth of the Society and congregation. Hc was a sound and profitable expositor of the Word of God; and faithful in administering the discipline of the Church. He gave habitual heed to Paul's counsel to Titus, "In all things showing thyself a pattern of good works : in doctrine showing uncorruptness, gravity, sincerity, sound speech, that cannot be condemned; that he that is of the contrary part may be ashamed, having no evil thing to say of you." After his retirement from the more arduous duties of the Itinerant ministry, he was, so far as his altered circumstances and his strength permitted, a spotless example of the same things. His death was in harmony with his

life, being distinguished by intelligent, humble, childlike trust in Christ. During his last illness he suffered much; and, at times, he was "in heaviness," through physical causes and temptations. But before the power of utterance failed, and while consciousness was yet unclouded, he gave distinct and encouraging signs of holy triumph; and especially bore witness to the truth of Peter's words, "Unto you, therefore, which believe He is precious." He died in the forty-ninth year of his ministry.

(4.) THOMAS WAUGH; who was born in Coleraine, May 9th, 1785. In boyhood he was in the habit of worshipping with the Methodists; and the late venerable William Ferguson, who became his life-long friend, induced him to meet in class. In the use of that means of grace, impressed by the testimonies borne to the reality and value of vital godliness, he sought and found reconciliation with God. As he approached maturity, the value of his mental qualities and the consistency of his piety were recognised by several intelligent friends. He had some attractive prospects in secular life, but his faithful Leader-who in a few hours after suddenly ceased to live—earnestly cautioned him against them, declaring his firm belief that God required his services for the work of the ministry. Mr. Waugh took this as a voice from heaven; and, as it was corroborated by his own convictions, and by the call of authority in the Church, he began to preach. In 1807 he was accepted as a candidate for our ministry, and the next year was appointed to a Circuit. Thenceforward, with untiring fidelity, he discharged the duties committed to him, and soon became distinguished for his ability and zeal. He did everything thoroughly, his work engaged his whole heart, and by the Divine blessing his services were fruitful in the best results. He was a man of a very catholic spirit, of humane and generous disposition, and strong and resolute will. Whatever he saw to be for the good of his country, the benefit of suffering humanity, and the glory of God, received his unselfish and able support. In defending the character, and promoting the interests of the Bible Society and the cause of Christian Missions, in advocating the abolition of slavery, and in founding and sustaining local charities, he was frequently and honourably associated with ministers and members of other Churches, without the slightest compromise of attachment to his own. The Methodist Church never had a more loval minister. His life was consecrated to her interests. He comprehensively grasped every essential of her administration. and opened his mouth boldly in the proclamation of her doctrine. His sagacity and sound judgment, intrepidity and energy, were unsparingly devoted to her welfare; and whether in the counsels of the Conference, the deliberation of committees, or the fulfilment of his pastoral dutics, he put forth his strength in her service, and won the respect and confidence of his brethren to an extent rarely conceded to any one man. For many years in succession he was one of our Representatives to the British Conference, and early secured a high place in the esteem of the members of that venerable Assembly. His services in the management of our financial affairs were invaluable, and some of our finest chapels are memorials of his tact, judgment, and prudence. His quick discernment of the character of a proposed object or scheme, rendered him sometimes impatient of discussion, and imparted to his manner an apparent severity; but no man was a more generous opponent, or could more heartily co-operate in carrying out what his brethren had resolved, though opposed to his own original views.

"Right, faithful, true, he was, in deed and word ;"

large-hearted, liberal and kind; devoted to Methodism, but catholic in spirit; intensely conservative, but readily engaging in what was new, if it fairly promised improvement in those interests which were dear to him. The later years of his life were shadowed over by the removal of his excellent wife, who for more than forty years had cheered and sustained him in his trials and cares; but, comforted by the Divine presence and favour, he peacefully spent the evening of his days in the town of Bandon, where, beloved by all immediately around him, respected by his fellow-citizens, and enjoying the approval of a good conscience, he passed away, in all the confidence of Christian faith and hope, on Tuesday, May 6th, 1873, in the eighty-eighth year of his age, and the sixty-fifth of his ministry.

3. In our Foreign Missions, nine; viz.,-

(1.) STEPHEN RABONE; who was born at Tipton, in Staffordshire, in 1811. In the prayers of his pious mother he loved to mark the instrumentality of his conversion to God in early life. The pleading tones of her voice before the mercy-scat ever afterwards thrilled his heart, and he spoke of them in the most affecting manner at the last Australasian Conference Lovefcast. The acceptance of those maternal intercessions was soon followed by the call of the dedicated son to eminent service in the field of Christian Missions. In 1834, he was appointed to labour in the Friendly Islands, but did not reach his destination till 1837, having suffered shipwreck on the way, which compelled a temporary return to England. In these Islands, amidst war and much unrest, he remained, with his devoted wife, till the year 1850, fulfilling his ministry with an ability and success which gave him a leading place among the noble men whose labours have resulted in the establishment of a flourishing Church and a Christian State in Tonga. During this time,

also, he rendered services of special value by his translation of the Scriptures and of other books into the Tonguese language. On leaving the Friendly Islands, he proved himself to be as useful and sagacious a minister in our Colonial as he had been in our Mission work. For upwards of twenty years no voice was more familiar than his in many parts of the colony of New-South Wales; in sonorous tones, and with much persuasiveness and holy influence, he proclaimed in all its fulness "the glorious Gospel of the blessed God." His preaching presented the fruits of various reading, of extensive observation, and of much secret prayer. It was thoroughly pervaded with fervent love to God. and to the souls of men, and was to the last edifying, acceptable, and full of freshness and force. His power in prayer was often remarkable. In all the duties of the Christian minister he was a willing and able worker, a model of accuracy, courtesy, and despatch. These characteristics were fully recognised by his brethren, through whose suffrages he became President of the Australasian Conference in 1861, and General Secretary, for nearly nine years, of the Missions under its care. He also filled for many years various important positions in relation to our Church in New-South Wales. With a beautiful completeness his life reached its close. In the year 1869 he visited our Polynesian Missions in connection with his old friend and fellowlabourer, the Rev. James Watkin, as a deputation from the Conference. The welcome given to the deputation, especially in the Friendly Islands, was enthusiastic, and yet also of the most practical character; for during the following year the contributions to the Mission Fund from the Tongan churches alone reached the noble sum of nearly five thousand pounds. Mr. Rabone continued to discharge his duties as Missionary Secretary during two years after his return to Sydney; and, so far as failing health would permit, preached on the Sabbath. He literally died in his work; for suddenly, while walking from his home in order to preach at Wesley Church, Sydney, on Sunday evening, July 21st, 1872, he expired in the street. He was carried to his burial amidst the most impressive manifestations of mourning and reverence from all classes. This faithful servant of the Lord Jesus died in the sixty-second year of his age, and the thirtyninth of his ministry.

(2.) PETER GERHARD DE ZYLVA; a man of rare piety and usefulness, was born in Colombo, September 17th, 1809. He feared the Lord from his youth, being favoured with the godly counsel and discipline of an excellent mother, and a religious training under an uncle who was a respected minister of our Communion. It was not, however, until he reached his twentieth year that he was made a partaker of the converting grace of God. In referring to this change, he said, "Having felt deeply the pangs of

a sinful conscience, I entered into my room, and having closed the door and prostrated myself on my knees, I poured out my soul in prayer, and pleaded the merits of Christ's death. I now felt Christ to be my Saviour, and my only Saviour. Then I felt a joy inexpressible, a joy that my sins were all pardoned. a iov that I, a hell-deserving sinner, am fully saved by grace; and it was a joy which enabled me with ecstasy to cry, 'Abba Father.'" The consciousness of acceptance with God through the Lord Jesus was at once followed by the desire to make Christ known to those who were strangers to His love. At the District Meeting, held in December, 1830, he was recommended to be received on trial as an Assistant-missionary, and appointed to Negombo. In subsequent years he laboured at Matura, Goddapitiya, and Pantura; and in 1842 he was appointed to Morotto, where for, twenty-two years he exercised his ministry with great acceptance and usefulness, as an energetic, faithful, and devoted missionary of the Cross. As a preacher, he was racy, faithful, powerful, and singularly successful. Many hundreds of souls were brought to God by his instrumentality. He was eminently devoted to God, "instant in season, out of season," and "mighty in the Scriptures." As a pastor, his name is still fragrant wherever he was called to minister. When affliction laid him aside, he settled in Colombo, and subsequently removed to Morotto, where he died, in great peace, July 25th, 1872, aged sixty-two years. The Holy Scriptures which he had unremittingly studied throughout his life, were his support and comfort at the approach of death.

(3.) JOSEPH BROADBENT; who was a son of the late Rev. Samuel Broadbent. He arrived in Calcutta in the early part of 1867, towards the end of which year he removed to Lucknow, where he was appointed to labour especially for the spiritual benefit of the military. Here, by his kindness of spirit, uniform attention to his duties, fidelity as a preacher, and untiring devotedness to everything calculated to promote the best interests of his charge, he gained the esteem, the confidence, and the love of all with whom he had to do. His death was very unexpected. From the time of his arrival in India, up to the attack of sickness which ended in his death, he had not been once ill. He seemed remarkably suited to the climate, and it was quite expected, until the morning of the day on which he died, that he would soon recover and resume his duties. The character of his complaint perhaps rendered impossible any manifestation of religious feeling, or any such expressions as we love to hear from the lips of the Lord's dying servants. He died in peace, and was buried in the cemetery at Lucknow, amidst general expressions of grief at his removal. Brother Broadbent lived and died well, and has left a name behind him which will be held in high

respect for a long time to come. He was called to his rest on Tuesday, August 20th, 1872, in the thirty-third year of his age, and the eighth of his ministry.

(4.) GIOVANNI ANNIGONI; who was born at Parma, in the year 1835. He was one of the first fruits of the Methodist Mission in Italy, and laboured for several years in Parma and its neighbourhood as a Local-preacher, before being called into the work as an Italian minister. During this period he was in the habit of visiting every Sabbath the village of Mezzano Inferiore, now one of the most flourishing evangelical stations in Italy. At Padua, where he first laboured as an Assistant-minister, his preaching was exceedingly popular, and he gave promise of great acceptance and usefulness. But very soon the symptoms of the disease that ultimately proved fatal to him began to manifest themselves, and for many months before his death he was greatly enfeebled both in mind and body. The cloud upon the intellect became more dense as his illness advanced. On this account no dying testimonies to the comforts of Divine grace can be quoted as falling from his lips, though his constant and pathetic appeals to the Saviour showed clearly that, though with broken wing, the distracted spirit fluttered for shelter to the sure and only Refuge. He died on the 24th of November, 1872, in the thirty-eighth year of his age, and the fourth of his ministry.

(5.) PHILIP H. NIEFFER; who was born May 27th, 1838, at Kirchheim-under-Teck. He was converted to God in London, and was for some years a member of our German Methodist Society in the east of London. Family affairs led him back to Germany, and he settled in Cannstatt, where, as a Local-preacher, he laboured with great zeal and acceptance. In 1871 he was received by the Conference as a preacher on trial, and was appointed to the Hall Circuit, where he was the means of bringing many sinners to Christ. His illness, inflammation of the lungs, quickly ran its course, and he died in great peace, on the 17th of December, 1872. His last words were, "Jehovah! Jesus! Amen !"

(6.) WILLIAM WALKER, East Indian minister; who was born at Madras, in 1813. In early life he was a subject of gracious influences, but he does not seem to have become decidedly religious till his twenty-seventh year. After having been employed for eight years as a schoolmaster and catechist, he was accepted, in 1854, as an Assistant-missionary in the Mysore District, and three years later was set apart to the full work of the ministry. He was a man of a kindly spirit, and of simple, genuine piety. He preached to the native Christians with much earnestness and feeling, and watched over them with fatherly care. Possessing an excellent colloquial knowledge of Canarese, and eonsiderable readiness in dealing with disputants, he was very efficient in street and village preaching to the heathen. His health had been feeble for several years, but for some months before his death he had felt much better. He had, however, notwithstanding this improvement, a presentiment that his end was near; and two or three times he spoke to his family of the change for which God was evidently preparing him. He anticipated death calmly and without misgivings. While abroad, on a long missionary tour, he was suddenly attacked by sickness, apparently induced by exposure, and sank in a few hours. He died in the Travellers' Bungalow, Cuddoor, on the 10th of February, 1873.

(7.) DANIEL PINNOCK; who was born in Kingston, Jamaica. He was converted to God in early life, through the instrumentality of the Rev. Richard Hornabrook, and thus commenced a career of consistency and usefulness which issued in his peaceful removal to his "Father's house." Before entering the Christian ministry, he was for seven years successfully employed as a Localpreacher, and as a teacher in one of our day-schools; and, though consciously called of God to the more sacred office, his timid and retiring nature hesitated long before hc could venture to undertake dutics of so responsible a character as he regarded those of a minister to be. At length, however, he yielded, and by faithfulness and success in his work proved himself "a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the Word of Truth." His gentle, unpretending piety commanded the affectionate respect of all who knew him. His mind was usefully stored, and he had a large acquaintance with standard divinity, as was evidenced by his ministrations and general converse. His disposition was exceedingly amiable; yet he was not easily moved from his own opinion unless his judgment was convinced. His preaching was practical, dealing directly with the consciences of his hearers, who felt, as they listened, that "the love of Christ constrained" him. He was diligent as a pastor, bestowing particular attention on the children in the schools. His death was induced through overfatigue in going to the District Meeting, from his having to walk much of the way on account of an accident to the vehicle in which he had been travelling. But the Master found His servant "watching." Though unable to speak for two days previously, shortly before his departure, in reply to a brother minister, who asked him, "Is the Atonement which you have often preached sufficient for you now? Is Jesus precious?" he was enabled feebly, but firmly, to answer, "Yes !" He then sank to rest, February 12th, 1873, in the forty-sixth year of his age, and the sixteenth of his ministry.

(8.) JOHN STEPHENSON (B); who was born at Egglestone, near Barnard-Castle, in the year 1837 He was brought up in connection with the Established Church, but did not experience the saving power of religion till he was twenty-one years of age, when he joined the Wesleyan-Methodist Society. He began to preach almost immediately, and two years later was accepted as a candidate for the ministry. He profited greatly by a three years' residence at Richmond, where he was a diligent student. In 1862 he was appointed to the Mysore District, in India, where he laboured during the remaining ten years of his life. With a transparent, unaffected character and a gentle spirit, he combined firm principle and a high sense of duty. He was very methodical in his habits, and diligently improved his time. Good natural abilities were carefully developed by study. His attainments in Canarese were excellent, and he turned them to good account. both in the pulpit and in the preparation of school-books. As a Canarese preacher he was fluent, earnest, and effective. He possessed more than usual qualifications as a missionary. His whole heart was in his work, and his great ambition was to spend his life in India. His death was quite unexpected. After ten years of singularly good health, he was attacked by an insidious disease, under which he speedily sank. He died at Ootacamund, on the Neilgherry Hills, April 5th, 1873, in the thirty-sixth year of his age, and the twelfth of his ministry.

(9.) WILLIAM SHEPSTONE; who died, aged seventy-six, at Kamastone, South Africa, May 26th, 1873, soon after his retirement, at his own request, from the Chairmanship of the Queen's-Town District. His health for many years past had been gradually on the decline, and the prospect of death had been long familiar to him. Nothing delighted him so much as converse on holiness and heaven. His final illness commenced on the 10th of May, and after sixtcen weary days and nights of severe suffering, borne with true Christian fortitude and meek submission to the Divine will, the end came without a pang. The consolations of God abounded to him throughout his illness. One of his latest exclamations in relation to his prospects was, "The fulness ! the fulness !----to all eternity !" his voice rising with each repetition of the word. Mr. Shepstone was one of the earliest of those who laboured with the late Rev. William Shaw, fifty years ago, in the first introduction of the Gospel into Pato's tribe, in Kaffirland. No man so thoroughly understood the Kaffir character, or was more able to meet the objections of the chiefs and others on their own ground, reasoning with them, and generally carrying them with him. In prudence and in meekness of wisdom he was an example to his brethren, and his memory will long be cherished by them.

Q. V Are there any OBJECTIONS to any of our Ministers, or Preachers on Trial ?

A. They were examined, one by one.

Q. VI. What persons, who were in full Connexion with the

Conference, have now CEASED TO BE RECOGNISED as Ministers among us?

A. JOHN JONES (E) and WILLIAM READING, who have voluntarily retired from our work.

Q. VII. How are our Ministers and Preachers on Trial STATIONED for the ensuing year ?

A. As follows ; viz.,-

5. The Conference adopts the following rules in relation to the Schools :---

(1.) Considering that the age at which the boys have been accustomed to leave school is the most important and valuable for the purposes of education, it is agreed that none shall henceforth be admitted into the Schools under nine years of age, and that they may remain the usual term of six years. Should parents prefer it, their sons may be admitted at ten years, and remain until sixteen years of age.

(2.) In any ease in which the Educational Allowance has been received by the parent, the elaim upon the Schools' Fund shall be understood to have been met and satisfied for that year.

(3.) In all eases of an additional year being granted, on payment, to boys who have not been at school six years, the sum of $\pounds 25$ shall be paid, which sum shall be inclusive of the $\pounds 6$ 6s. from the Children's Fund; but in all cases of request for a year additional to the six years, the Committee shall be satisfied that the character and diligence of the applicants are such as to render their return to the School advantageous to the other boys, and in such cases the payment shall be $\pounds 30$ inclusive of the $\pounds 6$ 6s. These payments shall be due in four instalments, immediately after each quarter-day.

N.B.—The regulations contained in the foregoing paragraphs apply to daughters as well as sons.

(4.) In future, the Competition for Scholarships shall be restricted to those boys who have not been more than six years at one of the Schools.

(5.) For the convenience of the officers of the Fund, the payment for education to both boys and girls shall commence at nine years instead of eight years, and be continued until fifteen years; the ninth year to be reekoned from the Christmas before payment. 6. Application for the admission of *daughters* to the Schools now established for them, must be made, as in the case of boys, through the District Meetings; and the allowances for those who are admitted shall not be claimed by the parents as heretofore from the Schools' and Children's Funds. The parents of *boys* in the Schools are also specially cautioned not to claim for them from the Children's Fund, much confusion having arisen in some cases from inattention to this rule.

7. The Conference directs that a certificate of health, signed by a medical practitioner, shall be required at the commencement of each term, in the case of all children received into, or returning to, our Connexional Schools.

8. The Conference adopts the following regulations in relation to the Schools for girls :---

(1.) That until as ample provision be made for the Connexional education of the daughters as for the sons of our Ministers, no girl shall be received into the Schools under *twelve* years of age, and that the time of continuance in the Schools be restricted to *four years*.

(2.) That in future each applicant be required to pass a preliminary examination, in subjects to be hereafter agreed upon, before admission to the Schools.

IMPROVEMENTS IN THE MANAGEMENT OF NEW KINGSWOOD AND WOODHOUSE GROVE SCHOOLS.

The Conference adopts the following Resolutions on the recommendation of the Special Committee appointed to consider this subject during the past two years :---

1. That while regarding with considerable favour the abstract principle, that it is desirable to admit the sons of laymen into our Connexional Schools, the Conference, in view of many practical difficulties, is not prepared to adopt this change in our arrangements.

2. That the system of dual government must, for the present, be maintained, but that its evils ought to be guarded against to the utmost by an exact definition of the several provinces of the Governor and the Head Master.

3. That the Local Committees be directed to secure, by means of higher salaries or otherwise, a more efficient class of Assistant-Tutors.

4. That the whole system of education in our two Schools shall be concentrated, and the Schools themselves be concentrated in one locality.

5. That the Woodhouse Grove estate be sold, and the proceeds of the sale devoted to the erection on the New Kingswood estate of additional buildings, for the use either of the higher or of the lower School, as may be hereafter determined. 6. That a Special Committee be appointed to make such arrangements as are necessary for carrying out the concentration of the Schools in one locality, powers being given to this Special Committee to act as occasion may require.

7 That while approving of the general principles of the new scheme for the management of the Schools, the Conference confides the details to the Special Committee.

8. That the question of the financial relations of the Schools' Fund to the Children's Fund, with a view, in particular, to secure an effective regulation, from year to year, of the amount to be drawn from the Children's Fund in augmentation of the revenues of the Schools' Fund, and to the due apportionment of the Schools' Fund among the different Schools, both for boys and girls, be remitted to the careful consideration of the Special Committee, in conjunction with the Committees of Management of the Schools for girls.

9. To this Special Committee the Conference refers all matters relating to the general management of the Schools, whether for boys or girls.

A. 1. The Conference cordially adopts the Resolutions of the Committee of Review, held in Neweastle-upon-Tyne, on Monday, July 28th, 1873; and directs that those Resolutions, and an Abstract of the Report then read, be printed in the Minutes. (See Appendix, No. IV., 1873.)

2. The Conference authorizes the President, during the year, to affix his signature to any consent to the sale of Trust Property which may be certified to him as approved by the Chapel Committee.

3. The Conference directs that the regulations applicable to the sale of Wesleyan-Methodist Trnst Property, shall also apply to the transfer of Wesleyan-Methodist School-premises to School-Boards, under the 23rd section of the Elementary Education Act. 1870, in any cases in which it may be found that the consent of the Conference is necessary.

4. MR. SAMUEL R. HEALEY, of Liverpool, is re-appointed one of the Treasurers of the General Chapel Fund.

5. MR. RICHARD HAWORTH, of Manchester, is now appointed one of the Treasurers of the General Chapel Fund.

SOUTH WALES DISTRICT CHAPEL FUND.

The Conference resolves :---

1. That a Fund be forthwith established in the South Wales District, to be called "The South Wales District Chapel Fund."

2. It shall comprise three Branches, namely :---

(1.) A. For the relief of debts on Chapels by the aid of Loans only, such Loans not to exceed in amount the contributions raised to meet them by the Trustees of Chapels thus aided. The Loan capital to consist of £750; viz., £500 already raised by contributions in South Wales, and £250 already lent by the Chapel Committee.

(2.) \hat{B} . In aid of the Erection and Enlargement of Chapels by Loans and Grants; for the relief of Chapel debts, in special cases, by Grants only; and for general expenses. The capital to consist of (i.) £250, to be raised by special subscriptions in the South Wales District. (ii.) A Loan, not exceeding £500, to be advanced by the Chapel Committee from their Erection Loan Fund, instead of the same amount previously promised from their Relief Loan Fund. The Loans on the A. and B. branches are not to exceed in amount the special contributions in the South Wales District to the same branches of the Fund.

N.B.—Provision is to be made for the repayment of the balance yet due to the Chapel Committee on the A. branch, and for the repayment of the Loan to be advanced to the B. branch

of the Fund, from the same sources as have already been sanctioned.

(iii.) The Collections and Subscriptions for the Chapel Fund, annually raised in the South Wales District. (iv.) Special Donations and Subscriptions. (v.) Income to be derived from such other sources as have been sanctioned in connection with the South Wales Loan Fund, in the terms of the arrangement between the Chapel Committee and the South Wales Loan Committee.

(3.) C. To be a supplement to the general scheme, and to be applied only in aid of providing Ministers' houses, and of removing existing debts on such houses, if duly settled upon Connexional Trusts; the capital to be raised by contributions expressly given for this purpose.

3. Donations expressly made to any one branch of the South Wales Fund shall be appropriated exclusively to that branch; but donations without any limitations by the donors, shall be applied to any of the branches by which the general purposes contemplated may, in the opinion of the South Wales Chapel Fund Committee, be best promoted.

4. This Fund shall be administered by a Committee, to be called "The South Wales Chapel Fund Committee," which shall consist of eight Ministers and eight laymen, to be annually appointed by the Conference, the lay members of the Committee being nominated by the South Wales District Meeting.

5. This Committee shall appoint from among themselves one Minister and one layman as Co-Treasurers of the Fund, and one Minister as Secretary of the Committee.

6. All moneys received on account of the Fund shall be deposited in a bank, and only withdrawn under the signature of both Treasurers.

7 This Committee shall have the same power to vote and settle Grants and Loans to Chapel Erections and Enlargements, and in relief of existing debts in the South Wales District, which is now possessed by the Chapel Committee with reference to Chapel cases in other parts of Great Britain.

8. The Chapel Fund shall be no longer applicable to the South Wales District, except with respect to Grants and Loans already promised but not paid.

9. When a Grant or Loan, in aid of a proposed Erection or Enlargement, shall be recommended by the Annual or Financial District Committee, the South Wales Chapel Fund Committee. shall, if they deem it necessary, before finally deciding on the case, appoint one or two of their own number to meet the Superintendent, the Trustees, and other friends, and examine all plans, estimates, tenders, lists of subscriptions, and other necessary matters, and report thereon to the Chairman of the District. If the report be satisfactory, the Chairman shall report to the General Chapel Committee, that the case may be proceeded with according to the established Rules of the Connexion.

10. Aid from any branch of the South Wales Fund shall be afforded only to such cases as shall be duly approved by the General Chapel Committee.

11. In any case of Erection or Enlargement in which the South Wales District Committee shall deem it to be expedient, the regulation requiring that three-fourths of the outlay be raised, may be relaxed. But, in every such case, no debt shall be allowed, except what may be advanced as a Loan by the South Wales Chapel Fund Committee, or, in the case of house-property, covered by an adequate house rental; and the Chapel Committee shall not decline to sanction the undertaking on the ground of the proposed amount of debt, provided that such debt shall have been agreed to by both the South Wales District Committee and the South Wales Chapel Fund Committee.

12. No case of Grant and Loan shall be settled until the General Chapel Committee shall certify that, in their opinion, the property is legally secured in trust for the Connexion.

13. All matters relating to this Fund, and the proceedings of the District Committee with regard to Trust Property, and of the District Chapel Fund Committee, shall be annually reported through the General Chapel Committee to the Conference. A statement of the accounts of the South Wales District Chapel Fund shall be printed in the Annual Report of the Chapel Committee.

14. In respect to all other particulars not herein expressly mentioned, the General Laws and Regulations of the Conference relating to Chapel Affairs shall apply to cases in the South Wales District, as in other parts of Great Britain.

HOME-MISSION AND CONTINGENT FUND.

Q. XVII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference in reference to the HOME-MISSION AND CONTINGENT FUND?

A. 1. The Conference receives and adopts the Report of the Committee of Management, and of the Army and Navy Committee, and directs that the Resolutions passed by the General Committee, and the Returns from the Army and Reserve forces, be printed in the Minutes. (See Appendixes, Nos. VI. and XI., 1873.)

2. The Conference is thankful to Almighty God for the success with which He has been pleased to favour our Home-Missionary work, and for the encouraging increase in the average allowances of Ministers in the Circuits aided by this Fund; and, whilst as anxious as ever to supply the spiritual needs of our large towns, is deeply convinced of the claims of our villages, many of which are now exposed to varied and destructive errors, and directs the special attention of the Committee of Management to the importance of considering the best practical method of extending our work and influence in the villages of this country.

3. Considering the success of our work in the Army and Royal Navy, and the increased facilities now afforded for our ministrations to Wesleyans, in both branches of Her Majesty's service, by the re-organization of the Army, and especially by the establishment of the Brigade Depots through the country, the Conference is anxious that these opportunities should be zealously embraced by our Ministers and people in all places in which troops are quartered, or where ships of the Royal Navy are stationed.

4. SUSTENTATION OF THE MINISTRY.—The Conference refers to the Committee of Management the recommendation adopted by the Home-Missionary Committee of Review, on the motion of MR. MAY, of Bristol, and resolves that a communication founded upon it shall be forwarded to the District Meetings in May, in

5. Public Meetings and Juvenile Home and Foreign Mis-SIGNARY ASSOCIATIONS.-The Conference rejoices to know that the Public Meetings held in behalf of our Home Missions have ministered to the edification and zeal of our people; that in some of our leading Circuits a Meeting has been held, during the year, in every Chapel, with great advantage to the Fund; and that, in some other Circuits, where only one Annual Meeting formerly took place, two or three Meetings have been recently convened. The Conference is convinced that the multiplication of these Meetings would be an effective auxiliary means of quickening the prayerful concern of our Societies and congregations for the conversion of their neighbours, as well as of their countrymen at large; and it strongly recommends that such Meetings should be held in all our principal Chapels. The Conference is glad to know, also, that there has been a gratifying increase in the number of Juvenile Home and Foreign Missionary Associations during the year, and it entertains the hope that these useful Associations-aiding at once our Home and Foreign Missions-will be established in all our Circuits.

The Conference is decidedly of opinion, that wherever sums, large or small, are collected avowedly for the Foreign or Home Missions, the whole amount should be remitted to the Treasurers of these Funds respectively, to be administered under the direction of their Committees; and that sums so remitted to the Home-Mission Fund should entitle a Circuit to favourable consideration, if it request a grant for any effort within its boundaries which may be a legitimate object for the application of moneys collected for Home-Missions. (Minutes, 1863.)

On this subject the following modification has been made :-In the case of Circuits which are not in a position to ask for

In the case of Circuits which are not in a position to ask for the appointment of a Home-Missionary Minister, and to give the pledge required, but which feel the necessity of adopting some plan of *Home-Missionary operations*, the subjoined allocation shall be allowed :—

One-third of the sums received by Juvenile Home and Foreign Missionary Associations, to be paid to the Funds of the Foreign Missionary Society, "it being expressly understood that in every case the contribution to the Foreign Missions shall be at least equal to what has been presented from Christmas Offerings, on the average of several preceding years :"

One-third to the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund :

One-third to the Circuit, to be expended in support of local movements of a *directly Home-Missionary character*, under the direction of the Superintendent, and of a Committee to be appointed at the December Quarterly Meeting.

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In all other cases the former Minute of the Conference remains in force.

6. The Conference dccms it expedient to reprint the following Rule from the Minutes of 1797 :---

"That all bills for the support of travelling preachers and their families, in respect to deficiencies, house-rent, fire, candles. sickness, travelling expenses and all other matters of a temporal kind for their support, for which the Circuits cannot provide, shall first meet with the approbation of the Quarterly Meeting, and be signed by the General Steward of the Circuit,* before they can be brought to the District Committee.

7 Home-Mission Regulations. — Each Home-Missionary Minister is directed, with the concurrence of the Superintendent Minister, to forward with his Journal, signed as now by the Superintendent, to the General Secretary for the information of the Committee, a copy of the Circuit-Plan; and a quarterly statement of the number of full and accredited Church-members, and of persons on trial, in connection with the place or places specially assigned to him as his Mission-District.

Q. XIX. What are the Resolutions of the Conference with regard to the WESLEYAN THEOLOGICAL INSTITUTION.

7 The Committee for the Special Examination of Candidates for our Ministry shall consist of the President and the Secretary of the Conference, the Ex-President, the Tutors and Governors of the three Branches of the Theological Institution, the Missionary Secretaries, the General Secretary of the Theological Institution, the Editors, the General Secretary of the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund, the Officers of the Education Committee, and six Ministers to be chosen by the District Committee of each of the two London Districts. The Rev. JOHN CLULOW, the REV. GEORGE W OLVER, B.A., and the REV. GEORGE O. BATE, are the Secretaries of this Committee.

8. In respect to the Examination of Candidates for the Ministry, the Conference further resolves that, as it will be impracticable for the Committee constituted as above to hear every candidate preach in connection with the July Examination, the present arrangement shall cease, excepting in such cases as the Examination Committee shall specially determine, and that arrangements shall be made by the May District Meetings for the hearing of each Candidate by one Minister of the District, in addition to those who may have heard him before his recommendation by the District Committee, such Minister to forward his report to the Secretaries of the Examination Committee direct.

EDUCATION

Q. XX. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of WESLEYAN EDUCATION ?

A. 1. The Conference adopts the Report and Resolutions of the Education Committee of Review, held in Newcastle-upon-Tyne, on Friday, July 25th, 1873; and directs that they be printed in the Minutes. (See Appendix, No. X., 1873.)

2. The Conference is gratified to learn that the number of Wesleyan-Methodist Sunday-Schools is now 5,689, with 666,766 Scholars, being an increase during the past year of 77 Schools, and 12,189 Scholars; also that the present number of our Day-Schools is 912, with 171,372 Scholars, being an increase during the past year of two Schools, and 4,967 Scholars.

3. The Conference expresses its thankfulness that the Income of the Education Fund has been increased during the past year, and that after meeting the current expenditure a satisfactory balance was earried to the Capital account; but the Conference regards it as of pressing importance that every effort be made in the Circuits to secure a further augmentation of Income with a view to the liquidation of the debt as soon as possible, and directs the Education Committee to give special attention to this subject during the year.

4. The Conference receives with satisfaction the statement presented by its Sceretary, the Rev. GERVASE SMITH, M.A., relative to the efforts made by him to liquidate the debt on the new Chapel at Westminster, and the success with which they have been crowned; and presents to $M_{\rm R}$. SMITH its cordial thanks for his faithful discharge of the duty assigned to him by the last Conference.

5. Recent legislation in reference to Public Elementary Education having rendered necessary some changes in "the Plan of Wesleyan Education" which was sanctioned by the Conference in 1841, the Conference adopts the following revision of the said Plan, and directs that it be printed in each Annual Report of the Education Committee.

I.—CONSTITUTION OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE OF EDUCATION.

The General Committee of Education shall consist of at least twenty-four Ministers and twenty-four Laymen, with two General Treasurers and a Secretary, to be annually appointed by the Conference.

II.—FUNCTIONS OF THE COMMITTEE.

1. To exercise a general supervision of the affairs of Wesleyan Education; to connect and combine the whole of our School operations, in their aggregate character, for the purpose of public utility; to be a medium of communication for the Connexion, on educational subjects, whether with the Government of the country or with other public bodies; and to promote and facilitate the adoption, in Wesleyan Schools, of such regulations as shall tend to secure the greatest practical efficiency, and to preserve Connexional harmony.

2. To direct the application of any Funds which may be entrusted to their care from any sources whatsoever.

3. To superintend the selection and training of Teachers, and to recommend such Teachers to Schools, on application from Local Committees.

4. To collect information on matters relating to the general interests of Education; to correspond with the Local Committees and Friends of Education, on various questions connected with Teachers, Inspectors, etc.; to promote the formation of New Schools, wherever practicable, as well as to encourage those already formed, especially by advice and friendly co-operation.

5. To prepare, from their official documents, an Annual Report of their proceedings, and of the general progress of Wesleyan Education.

III.—PRINCIPLES ON WHICH WESLEYAN SCHOOLS ARE TO BE CONDUCTED.

I. SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

GENERAL RULES.

The General Principles recommended by the Conference of 1827 (see *Minutes*) for the regulation of Wesleyan-Methodist Sunday-Schools, shall form the permanent basis for the management of each School, and therefore ;--

I. It shall be conducted in distinct and avowed connection with the Wesleyan-Methodist Society; and shall, in every practicable way, be worked in harmony with its arrangements and with a view to its increase and benefit.

II. Its main object shall be to instruct and train scholars in "the doctrines, privileges, and duties of the Christian religion," and only so much secular teaching as is necessary to secure this end shall be given in it on the Sabbath-day. The Holy Scriptures and the Catechisms of the Wesleyan-Methodists shall be used as the means of such instruction and training.

III. The general management shall be entrusted to a Committee, consisting—

- 1. Of all the Ministers of the Circuit.
- 2. Of the Treasurer, the General Secretary, and the Superintendents of the School, appointed as hereinafter mentioned.
- 3. Of six, nine, or more persons, to be chosen as follows: viz.,—
 - One-third, being Members of the Wesleyan-Methodist Society, by the Leaders' Meeting, in the month of December.
 - One-third, being Teachers, Secretaries, or Librarians, who are also Members of the Wesleyan-Methodist Society, by a General Teachers' Meeting, in the month of December.
 - One-third by the Committee for the time being, at their last meeting in December, from members of the congregation or Subscribers to the School, who, if not Members of Society, are nevertheless believed to be cordially attached to the principles and polity of Wesleyan-Methodism.

IV The Annual Meeting of the Committee and Subscribers, of which due notice shall be given by the General Secretary, shall be held as early as convenient in the month of January, to receive the financial report and the lists of the persons chosen in the manner above described, to be members of the Committee for the ensuing year; and to appoint a Treasurer and Auditors for the ensuing year.

N.B.—1. Subscribers within the meaning of this rule are those persons, not under twenty-one years of age, who contribute annually five shillings or upwards towards the support of the School.

2. Those Teachers who have attained the age of twenty-one. and have been fully received not less than one year, shall be considered as having a right to attend and take part with the Subscribers in the proceedings of the Annual Meeting. 3. When it is deemed necessary, in addition to the Annual Meeting, a Public Meeting, to promote the interests of the School and of Christian education generally, may be held at any time of the year most convenient.

V The Superintendent Minister of the Circuit shall preside in the Annual Meeting, and in all meetings of the Committee or the Teachers, at which he is present; and in his absence, his place shall be supplied by one of the other Ministers; or, if no Minister be present, by one of the Officers of the institution, to be appointed by the Meeting, except that in the Teachers' Meetings one of the Superintendents of the School shall preside.

VI. The Officers of the School shall be as follows ; viz.,-

- 1. A Treasurer.
- 2. A General Secretary, one or more Superintendents, and one or more Visitors; to be annually appointed by the Committee.
- 3. One or more School Secretaries, and a Librarian; to be annually chosen by the Teachers' Meeting, subject to the approval of the Committee.
- N.B.—All the Officers, with the exception of the Treasurer, shall be selected exclusively from the Members of the Wesleyan-Methodist Society.

VII. The Committee shall meet at least once a quarter, and oftener, if required, with the concurrence of the Superintendent of the Circuit; and five shall form a quorum for the transaction of business.

VIII. The Teachers, wherever practicable, shall be members of the Wesleyan-Methodist Society; but if not, they must at least be regular attendants at the Chapel, of good moral character, heartily attached to the doctrines and discipline of Methodism, and willing to observe the Rules of the School.

IX. They may be received on trial by the Superintendent of the School; and, after a probation of three months, shall be nominated by him at a regular Teachers' Meeting, and elected by the Meeting; subject, however, to the approbation of the Committee.

X. A united Meeting of the Committee and Teachers shall be held once in every six months, or oftener, if need be, on some suitable week-day evening, expressly for the recognition of newly-appointed Teachers; when the Chairman shall present the Rules, and give appropriate advice and encouragement to the Teachers thus recognised.

XI. Teachers' Meetings for inquiry, consultation, and prayer, shall be held quarterly, previous to the ordinary Meetings of the Committee.

XII. In the selection of Teachers for the elder classes, special attention shall be paid to their Christian experience; and those

only shall be so employed who are able to teach the scholars, clearly and fully, what they must do to be saved.

XIII. No person shall be continued, as an Officer or Teacher, who shall at any time be declared, by the Committee or the Leaders' Meeting, unfit, in respect of general character or of religious opinions, for the office he sustains, or for taking part in the Christian education of the young.

XIV The Elementary books employed in teaching even the younger children shall be such as contain the largest portion of Scriptural instruction, and the Holy Scriptures shall be regularly used by all who are sufficiently advanced.

XV Catechetical exercises shall form a constant part of the system of the School, and the Catechisms used shall be those published under the sanction of the Wesleyan-Methodist Conference.

XVI. The School shall be opened and closed with singing and prayer; and the large Hymn-Book, The Methodist Scholars' Hymn-Book, or The Wesleyan-Methodist Sunday-School Hymn-Book, shall be used.

XVII. Neither the art of writing, nor any branch of merely secular knowledge, shall be taught on the Lord's Day

XVIII. The Library, together with the School furniture, shall be the property of the Committee, without whose approval no book shall be introduced; and, wherever practicable, the distribution of books shall take place on some week-day evening, so as not to occasion, either to the Librarian or to the readers, an unnecessary and injurious diversion of any portion of the Lord's Day from employments directly spiritual.

XIX. No sales of books, or of other articles used in the School, shall be allowed on the Sabbath, but suitable facilities for the supply of the scholars shall be provided on week-days.

XX. The Meetings of the Committee, for ordinary business, shall not be held on the Lord's Day, and Teachers' Meetings, if *unavoidably* so held, shall be fixed for such hours as will not interfere with attendance at Public Worship, Society Meetings, or the Lord's Supper.

XXI. All the scholars shall be trained to regular attendance on Public Worship, at least once on the Lord's Day. As many as can be accommodated shall attend the Chapel every forenoon; and the elder scholars, especially, shall be encouraged to attend the evening service also.

N.B.—We earnestly entreat our friends who may be concerned in the future erection or enlargement of Chapels, to have this object in view, as one of unspeakable importance to the interests of religion and of our country; and to include in their plans the provision of large and convenient accommodation, not only for the adult poor, but for their children also.

XXII. Whenever it is practicable, a select class, or classes, of

those scholars who are seriously disposed shall be formed, for special religious instruction and prayer, and be met by pious teachers in separate class-rooms, towards the close of the Sunday afternoon, or on some convenient week-night.

PRACTICAL DIRECTIONS FOR INTERNAL MANAGEMENT.

1. The Committee.—The general duties of the Committee are, to devise means for raising the necessary supplies; to disburse the funds according to the requirements of the School; and to exercise a vigorous control over all the affairs of the institution, in accordance with its established rules.

2. The Treasurer.—The Treasurer should receive and pay all money on account of the School, under the direction of the Committee.

3. The Auditors.—The Auditors should certify the accuracy of the Treasurer's accounts, by affixing their names to them, after they have examined them with the vouchers.

4. The General Secretary.—The General Secretary should convene and attend all Meetings of the Committee or of the Subscribers, take minutes of their proceedings, and prepare a written report on the state of the School for the Annual Meeting.

5. The Superintendents.—The Superintendents are responsible for opening and closing the School with singing and prayer; for the admission of scholars, and the arrangement of classes and Teachers; and for the internal management of the School.

6. The School Secretaries.—The School Secretaries should take charge of the School Registers and Journal; give notice of Teachers' Meetings, both to the Superintendent or other Minister, and to the Teachers, and take minutes of their transactions; and furnish periodical reports of the condition of the School for the Committee.

7. The Teachers.—Teachers are expected to be regular and punctual in their attendance at the School, and to accompany their classes to the House of God; and to do all in their power, both by teaching and example, to promote the great end of the institution,—the religious instruction and salvation of the scholars.

A Teacher, when provented from attending the School, should either provide a proper substitute, or give the Superintendents timely notice of his intended absence.

Definite arrangements should be made for the visitation of absentee scholars, either by the Teachers themselves, or by a Visitor or Visitors, duly appointed.

8. The Scholars.—Children, especially when coming from another School, should be admitted on the application of parents

or guardians. Very young children, and adults, are best taught in a separate room.

9. The Library.—Every School should, if possible, have a Library for the use of the Officers and Teachers, and such Scholars as may be deemed worthy of that privilege.

II. DAY SCHOOLS.

(I.)-RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION AND WORSHIP.

Such Schools shall be of a distinctively religious character; and, as practical means to realise this important purpose, the following elementary arrangements are deemed indispensable; viz.:—

1. The BIBLE, in the Authorized Version only, shall be the basis of all the religious instruction; and a certain portion of every day, at least half an hour, shall be set apart for the devotional reading of the Holy Scriptures, with explanations by the Teacher, Minister, or duly appointed Visitor, or for Catechetical instruction.

2. The Authorized WESLEYAN CATECHISMS shall be used in all our Schools, subject to such provisions of the Elementary Education Act of 1870, as are commonly known collectively as "The Conscience Clause."

3. CHRISTIAN PSALMODY—in which the Wesleyan Hymn-Book, of other Hymn-Book, published or approved by the Wesleyan Education Committee, shall be used—shall form a part of the daily exercises.

4. The School duties of each day shall begin and end with PRAYER.

(II.)—GOVERNMENT.

Each Day School shall be under the immediate care and direction of a Local Committee, annually appointed, which shall include the Wesleyan Ministers of the Circuit, for the time being; the Officers of the School, such as the Treasurer, Secretaries, and Visitors; and a suitable number of the friends of Education connected with our Body, either as members of our Society, or at least as worshippers in our Chapels.

(III.)-Support.

The pecuniary support of each School shall be provided for by the Local Committee, from the weekly payments of the Scholars, from Local Subscriptions and Collections, and from any other available sources.

(IV)—TEACHERS.

1. Every Teacher employed in the Schools, or trained for them, shall be of a decidedly religious character, and in connection with the Wesleyan-Methodist Society.

2. Every such Teacher shall be recommended by the Superintendent Minister of the Circuit in which he or she resides; and previously to his or her actual nomination to a School by the General Committee of Education, shall have been examined and approved by them, or by persons deputed to examine on their behalf.

(V.)-School-Houses.

All the School-Rooms or Houses built, or to be built, for Wesleyan Schools, shall be held in trust for the Connexion, in a manner similar to the settlement of Chapel property among the Wesleyan-Methodists, and in accordance with the provisions of the School Model Deed (formerly known as No. II.) adopted by the Conference in 1845.

(VI.)—STATISTICS.

The Secretary of each School shall be requested to furnish to the General Committee, through the Superintendent of the Circuit, an Annual Report of the state of the School, as provided for by Schedules and other forms of inquiry issued by direction of the General Committee.

IV.—GENERAL CONNEXIONAL AID AND CO-OPERATION.

THE RULES OF THE CONFERENCE ARE AS FOLLOWS :---

1. The following questions shall be considered in each May District Meeting, during that portion of the business of the District Committee when both Ministers and Laymen are present; and the answers obtained shall be recorded in the Minutes of each District, viz. :—

(1.) What is the number and state of the Wesleyan Sunday and Week-Day Schools in this District ?

(2.) Are all possible care and effort used to promote the formation and success of Week-Day Schools in connection with our Societies in this District?

2. Previously to the District Meeting, the Superintendent in each Circuit, or one of his Colleagues appointed by him, shall make timely application to the School Secretaries of each place in the Circuit where a Sunday or Week-Day School is established, for the information required for the filling up of the Schedules provided by the General Committee; and after filling them up and laying them before the Quarterly Meeting, shall forward them as directed by the Conference. (See page 181, § 8.)

3. The Education Secretary appointed by each District Meeting in accordance with the Regulations of the Conference, shall collect the Schedules, summarize the Statistics contained in them, present to the District Committee in May a Report on the Schools of the District, and transmit the Schedules with any Resolutions of the District Committee relating to Education, to the Secretary of the General Education Committee.

4. Arrangements shall be made upon each Circuit Plan for the regular Visitation of each Day School in the Circuit, by one or more of the Ministers of the Circuit, for religious instruction and catechizing during the time shown to be allotted for such purposes by the time-table of each School.

5. It is earnestly urged upon all the Societies to promote the formation of Week-Day Schools in connection with every principal Chapel in each Circuit, and to encourage the formation of School Libraries and Bible-classes, for the explanation, illustration, and religious application of the Scriptures, wherever practicable.

6. Having received and considered a scheme for the formation of a Connexional Sunday-School Union submitted by the Education Committee, the Conference resolves as follows :---(1.) That it is desirable to supplement existing Connexional arrangements for union among Wesleyan-Methodist Sunday Schools by the establishment of a Connexional Sunday-School Union. (2.) That such a Union should embrace the following objects ;---to promote the development of the Sunday-School system with the special design of securing greater spiritual results ;---to promote union among Wesleyan-Methodist Sunday Schools in the several Circuits, and to encourage the Connexional element in their character and working; ----to supply Teachers with such aid and information as shall tend to the more efficient instruction of their Classes ;---to collect and give information respecting the best methods for the organization and management of Wesleyan-Methodist Sunday Schools ;- to obtain, record, and supply statistical details as to the condition of Wesleyan-Methodist books and appliances, and books for rewards and libraries. (3.) The Conference provisionally approves the draft of arrangements for the constitution and working of the Union which has been prepared by the Education Committee. (4.) The Conference directs that the next Financial District Meetings shall be made special for the consideration of the scheme ; and that any suggestions in reference thereto which the District Meetings may adopt be transmitted to the Secretary of the Education Com-The Conference empowers that Committee to revise the mittec. scheme, to complete its details, and to perfect the necessary arrangements with the Book-Committee. (5.) The Conference authorizes the President to convene a Special Meeting of Ministers and Laymen to consider the scheme after its final revision by the Education Committee.

7. The Conference directs that the Statistics of the Day and Sunday Schools of the Circuit be read in the March Quarterly Meeting, but that if sufficient time be not then available for the discussion of the statistics and inquiry into the state of the Schools, such discussion and inquiry shall take place in the June Quarterly Meeting. 8. The Conference directs that the Education Schedules, having been duly filled up and presented to the March Quarterly Meeting, shall be sent by the Superintendents to the Education Secretary of the District, not later than April 10th.

9. The Conference directs all who are contemplating the erection or alteration of premises, for the establishment of new Schools, to communicate with the Education Committee, for the purpose of receiving counsel as to the general eligibility of their projected undertakings, and the adaptation of the premises to the system of instruction designed to be adopted.

10. (1.) In view of the interpretation which is put upon Section XXIII. of the Elementary Education Act of 1870 by the Lords of the Committee of Council, to the effect that any transfer of a School, settled upon our School Model Deed No. I., to a School Board, for any term whatever, for the purposes of such School Board, must be sanctioned not only by the signatures of the Trustees, but by the Conference, testified by the President in writing; the Conference directs that in every case in which the transfer of such a School is proposed, the Superintendent, with the Managers and Trustees acting in concert, shall first eonsult the Education Committee on the subject, and that if, for reasons given, that Committee recommends such a transfer, the rules of the Conference in relation to the sale of Trust Property shall be applicable thereto :-- the Education Committee considering all questions affecting School management, and the Chapel Committee questions affecting Trust Property.-(2.) In respect to Schools settled on the School Model Deed No. II., or on any other Deed in which the eonsent of the Conference is rendered necessary for the alienation of the property, the Confcrence recommends the Trustees to act upon the same principles as those laid down in the foregoing elause in relation to Schools settled on the School Model Deed No I .-- (3.) In all cases of transfer which may hereafter occur, the Conference recommends that provision be made in the instrument of transfer to secure the resumption of the premises by the Trustees without their being required to reimburse any money laid out by the School Board solely for its own purposes.

11. The REV. J. CLULOW is appointed to act under the direction of the Education Committee in the Visitation and Inspection of Day and Sunday Schools.

12. Mr. ISAAC HOYLE and the REV. THEOPHILUS WOOLMER are re-appointed the Treasurers; and the REV. GEORGE O. BATE is re-appointed the Secretary.

HIGHER EDUCATION.

Q. XXI. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on receiving the Report of the Special Committee on HIGHER EDUCATION?

A. 1. The Conference adopts the suggestions of the Committee on the improvement of Methodist Trust Property in Oxford, (see Appendix, No. XII., 1873,) and empowers the Committee now appointed on Higher Education to carry them out.

2. The Conference, having considered the proposals to establish a High School in connection with the Town of Cambridge, and to acquire the Leys Estate for that purpose, generally approves the design of establishing such a School, and gives to the Committee on Higher Education now appointed a discretionary power to acquire the estate in question, or other suitable property, provided they are satisfied of the expediency of such a step, and also that the means can be raised without undue pressure on the Connexion.

3. The Conference gives a general approval to the scheme for the constitution of the Governing Body, and to the general plan of the proposed School, as detailed in the Report of the Special Committee on Higher Education. (See Appendix, No. XII., 1873.)

4. The Conference gives a general approval to the suggestions contained in Part II. of the Report of the Committee.

5. The Conference refers a statement made by the Rev. W F. Slater respecting the Cambridge Circuit to the Committee on Higher Education.

EXAMINATION OF PREACHERS ON TRIAL.

Q. XXIV. What directions does the Conference give concerning the Annual Examination of PREACHERS ON TRIAL ? A. 1. The Conference adopts the following general Resolutions recommended to it by a Committee specially appointed to consider the subject :---

(1.) That in future the Examination of Preachers on Trial shall be conducted by a Connexional Board of Examiners, to consist of one Examiner in each subject contained in the course of reading prescribed for the four years of probation.

(2.) That the Probationers' Examination Committee be appointed as heretofore; but that, in addition, two General Examination Secretaries be appointed by the Conference from among Ministers stationed in the same town.

(3.) That arrangements be made, at each Financial District Meeting, for a Central Examination of Preachers on Trial in each District, or more than one if necessary; at which Central Examination all the Probationers in that District shall attend. In the event of any Preacher on Trial being unable to pay the necessary travelling expenses, they shall be defrayed by the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund.

(4.) That at each Financial District Meeting a District Probationers' Examination Secretary be appointed, or more than one, so as to provide a Secretary to take charge of each Central Examination in the District; and that the District Secretary be held responsible for the efficient conduct of the Central Examination. Full and clear instructions as to the course to be pursued are to be forwarded to the District Secretaries by the General Secretaries.

(5.) That the Examination take place throughout the Connexion on some day in the first week of April in each year, to be published in the Minutes of Conference.

(6.) That the Examination-Papers, prepared as heretofore, under the direction of the Committee, shall be sent by the General Secretaries to each District Examination Secretary, whose duty it shall be to distribute them at the Central Examination, and by the earliest post transmit to the General Secretaries the Papers written by the several Probationers at those Examinations.

(7.) That the Probationers' Papers be forwarded by the General Secretaries to the Examiners for valuation, and that each Examiner send to them the results of his valuation of the Papers shown by numbers as heretofore, together with any remarks upon them which he may think desirable.

(8.) That the Secretaries compile from the returns of the Examiners a complete Report upon the reading of each Probationer, and forward it to the District Examination Secretary, to be presented by him to the May District Meeting, together with such remarks on the Examination of the Preachers on Trial in the District as he may think desirable.

(9.) That the General Secretaries prepare and present to the Conference in each year a General Report upon the Examination of the Preachers on Trial.

It is with sineere regret that the Conference accedes to the recommendation of the Sheffield District Committee, that the request of the REV. DR. STAMP to become a Supernumerary should be granted. His unblemished character during fifty years, his able and judicious administration of the system and discipline of Methodism in the several offices of Superintendent of Circuits, Chairman of Districts, and President of the Conference, which he has so diligently and faithfully filled, and his entire devotedness to the interests of the Connexion in its several departments. have strongly endeared him to his brethren ; and they earnestly hope that, in his comparative retirement, he will be blessed with the presence and consolation of the Holy Spirit, and pray that, in years to come, he may still be found among them in their annual assembly, affording to them valuable eounsel and help, such as his thorough knowledge of Methodism, in its system and working, will enable him to give.

RETIREMENT OF THE REV CHARLES HAYDON.

The Conference, in sanctioning the retirement of the Rev. CHARLES HAYDON from the regular work of the Ministry, in which he has been successfully engaged for forty-eight years, feels it to be right to place on record its sense of the able and exemplary manner and eminently Christian spirit in which he has, for so long a period, fulfilled his ministerial duties. Mr. Haydon has not only served the Societies of Methodism as a Preacher, as the Superintendent of large Circuits, and as the Chairman of important Districts, but has laid his ministerial brethren under no ordinary weight of obligation by the assiduity and skill with which he has watched over the interests of the Annuitant Society. The Conference unites in the hope and prayer that Mr. Haydon may be spared for many years in honourable and useful retirement to serve his brethren and the Connexion.

RELATIONS OF THE CONFERENCE TO THE CONFERENCES OF CANADA AND EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA.

The Conference, having earefully considered the subjects specially referred to it in the Address from the Conference of the Wesleyan-Methodist Church in Canada, and that of the Wesleyan-Methodist Church of Eastern British America, together with the statements of their respective Representatives, unanimously agrees to the following conclusions, viz. :--

1. The Conference has good reason to feel assured that the arrangements concluded with the Canadian Conference in 1847,

and with the Conference of Eastern British America in 1855, as referred to in the Minutes of Conference, were most judicious and appropriate in the circumstances which then existed, and have been highly conducive to the consolidation and development of Mcthodism in the several provinces to which they relate.

2. Nevertheless, considering-

(1.) That those Conferences are now included in the United Dominion of Canada, as recently established by an Act of the Imperial Legislature, that facilities are thereby afforded for consolidating the interests of the two Conferences in one Connexion, and that, for many weighty reasons, their union is highly desirable :---

Considering (2) that the geographical extent of the Dominion of Canada would render it inconvenient to hold one Annual Conference for the Connexion now to be consolidated in the said Dominion :---

Considering (3) that a union of such consolidated Connexion with other Methodist Bodies within the Dominion may become possible and desirable, and that suitable facilities should be afforded for the furtherance of such a union :—

Considering (4) that several important measures have been taken by the said two Conferences respectively in favour of a project of union between themselves, and in anticipation of their union with other Methodist Bodies :---

•The Conference resolves as follows :----

1. This Conference formally rescinds the Articles of Union which now subsist between the Connexion in Great Britain and the Conferences of Canada and Eastern British America respectively, and gives to those Conferences the right to conclude such arrangements for their own consolidation into one Body, and for their entering into terms of union with other Methodist Bodies, as shall be in accordance with the doctrines of Methodism contained in Mr. Wesley's first four volumes of Sermons, and his Notes on the New Testament, and with a system of discipline which, while adapted to the altered circumstances of Canadian Methodism, shall preserve the fundamental principles of a Connexional form of Church-government.

2. This Conference also confers upon the two Conferences now existing, and through them, and by such arrangements as they shall agree to, upon the Connexion to be consolidated in the Dominion of Canada, all such rights and interests as it may now possess by virtue of the existing Articles of Union, or by virtue of any Deeds or Instruments relating to any Trust Property secured for the benefit of either of the present Conferences.

3. This Conference further directs that the official seal of the Conference be affixed to any document which may be necessary for declaring its full concurrence in any application which the Canada Conference, or the Conference of Eastern British America, may see fit to make either to the Parliament of the said Dominion, or to any provincial Legislative Assembly within the same, or to any Parliament or Legislative Assembly outside the bounds of the said Dominion, but comprised within the bounds of either of the Conferences aforesaid, for such powers as may be necessary to the vesting of the whole or any part of the Trust Property now held for the use of either of the said Conferences, or of any Ministers, Trustees, or others in connection with either of the same, in such manner and upon such terms as shall secure the same to uses and upon trusts in connection with the proposed united Conference, similar, as nearly as may be, to those for which they are now secured.

4. In cordially agreeing to the preceding resolutions, the Conference expresses its affectionate regard for the two Conferences named; its earnest prayers that they may be guided by Divine wisdom in all their deliberations and decisions, and favoured with great prosperity in the work which lies before them in the Dominion, and wherever their Missions may be planted; and the gratification which it will have in receiving and sending from time to time communications, by deputations or otherwise, which may express and promote an abiding feeling of fraternal union.

METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH SOUTH, UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

The Conference resolves that a fraternal letter shall be sent to the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, which is to assemble in the spring of 1874, and appoints the Ex-President, the Rev. William Arthur, M.A., and the Rev. W Morley Punshon, LL.D., to prepare such a letter.

RESOLUTIONS RESPECTING TEMPERANCE.

The Conference, having considered the suggestions made to it by several District Committees, resolves as follows :---

1. That a Temperance Committee be appointed to meet, from time to time, as occasion may require, during the ensuing year, such Committee to consist of Ministers representing different views on the general question.

2. That it shall be the duty of this Committee, in such manner as it may deem advisable, to promote legislation for the more effectual control of the liquor-traffic, for the lessening of the number of public-houses and beer-houses, for the closing of such houses on the Lord's Day, and in general for the suppression of intemperance.

3. That such Committee shall also be instructed to inquire into the question of Intemperance, in relation to Christian effort in general, and Methodism in particular; to gather information as to the various agencies employed for its suppression; and to consider by what means, in consistency with the unity and harmonious working of our Connexional system as to its discipline and worship, the influence of Methodism may be most effectually employed for the remedy of this wide-spread and demoralizing evil

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4. That the Committee thus appointed shall report to the next Conference.

5. That if, after the consideration of the report so presented, the Conference should deem it advisable to appoint a standing Committee on Temperance, such Committee should include both Ministers and Laymen.

The Conference further affirms its conviction that, pending the inquiry now resolved upon, it is most desirable that both Ministers and people should study to avoid everything in word or work which would place any additional difficulty in the way of united and harmonious Connexional action.

The following Ministers are, for this year, appointed the Committee on Temperance :—The Ex-President, the Revs. William Arthur, M.A., John Bedford, Samuel Coley, John Farrar, Charles Garrett, Joseph Hargreaves, Ebenezer E. Jenkins, M.A., Dr. Jobson, Alexander M'Aulay, George Maunder, George W. Olver, B.A., Dr Punshon, Marshall Randles, John V.B. Shrewsbury, Dr. Stamp, and T. Bowman Stephenson, B.A.

POPISH TENDENCIES IN GREAT BRITAIN.

The Conference, having considered the resolution of the Manchester District Committee, calling its attention to the dangers to which Scriptural Christianity and national freedom are exposed by the pretensions and movements of Popery in Great Britain and elsewhere, and more especially by the prevalence in our own country of Popish practices outside of the Romish Church, -and considering further that recently a very considerable number of elergymen of the Church by law established, have publicly moved, with a view to procure legislation which shall organize the Confessional as a national institution, -feels bound to record its conviction of the extreme gravity of such facts, not only for any one portion of the English people, but also for the nation at large. It is persuaded that the time has come when those who value the doctrines of the Reformation, and the institutions, whether religious or national, to which they have given birth, are called upon to take all possible means, both as citizens and as members of Churches, for the diffusion of Scriptural Truth and the repression of Romish principles, and also to unite with all Protestants in promoting measures which will tend to prevent the influence and authority of the nation from being directly or indirectly employed to further movements calculated to discredit and even to undo the Reformation, to the influence of which, under Divine Providence, are due inestimable national benefits. The Conference expresses its hope and belief that our people generally will earnestly strive, in their respective spheres of private or public influence, and in so doing will cheerfully co-operate with all who are like-minded, whether within the Established or Nonconformist Churches, in support of every effort to repair the damage done, in many successive years, to the cause of Protestantism, and to perpetuate in England that Reformed Faith, the rejection or suppression of which in other countries of Europe has been followed by political instability and social disorder, as is witnessed, at the present day, in the greater part of such countries.

NATIONAL EDUCATION IN IRELAND.

In view of the demands put forth in regard to National Education by the Roman-Catholic Bishops of Ireland, the Confcrence again affirms its resolution to use every legitimate means to oppose these demands, as contrary not only to every interest of Protestant Christianity, but also to the principles of civil and religious liberty.

CONSTITUTION OF THE STATIONING COMMITTEE.

The Conference adopts, for this year, the following arrangements :---

1. That a Committee, consisting of the President and the Secretary of the Conference, the Ex-President, and four other Ministers, be appointed to prepare a draft of the Stations, to be submitted to the Stationing Committee at their first meeting.

2. That the Representative of each District shall send to this Committee, at least fourtcen days before the time of its meeting, a prospective arrangement of the Stations in his District, specifying, in each case, whether the appointment is for a third, second, or first year, which appointments are made as the result of agreement between Circuits and Ministers, as well as the names of any Ministers for whom the Representative has not been able to make any satisfactory arrangement.

3. That this Committee be authorized to correspond with the Representatives of Districts, during the fourteen days above referred to, in order to obtain information on any subject which may, in any way, affect the Stations.

4. That the four elected members of this Committee shall be elected by ballot of the Conference, taken immediately after the Stations are confirmed; that the members of it shall not be eligible to represent any District, but shall be *ex-officio* members of the Stationing Committee.

The four Ministers chosen for the year 1874, by ballot of the Conference, are the Revs. John Farrar, Dr. Stamp, Dr. Punshon, and John Rattenbury.

RE-ARRANGEMENT OF DISTRICTS.

On this subject the Conference resolves as follows :---

1. That a Committee be appointed, consisting of an equal number of Ministers and laymen, to revise the Plan prepared by the Committee appointed by the Conference of 1871, with the help of the additional information derived from the District reports, and assign such reasons for it as they may agree upon; and that the Plan, as so revised, be submitted to the May District Meetings, after receiving the reports from which District Meetings the Committee shall prepare a final Scheme. This Scheme shall be laid before a mixed Committee to meet on the Saturday before the next Conference, consisting of the Committee now appointed, the Chairmen of Districts, and the Gentlemen who may be chosen by the Lay-Members of the May District Meetings to attend the Annual Meeting of the Home Mission and Contingent Fund Committee ; which Committee shall report to the next Conference.

2. The following Ministers and Gentlemen shall constitute the Committee to revise the Plan for the re-arrangement of Districts; viz.,—The President and the Secretary of the Conference, the Ex-President, the Revs. John Bedford, John Bond, George Bowden, John W Greeves, Charles H. Kelly, John M'Kenny, Dr. Rigg, Dr. Stamp, Edwin H. Tindall, Theophilus Woolmer: with Messrs. Henry John Atkinson, James S. Budgett, William T. Eastman, Sidney B. Hodge, Frederick Howard, George Lidgett, B.A., Sir Francis Lycett, Alexander M'Arthur, John H Mason, William Mewburn, J. Sizer, James Vanner, and William T. Whelpton.

3. The Rev. George Bowden is appointed the Secretary of this Committee.

COMMITTEES OF REVIEW

The Conference remits to the Committee now appointed to revise the Plan for the re-arrangement of Districts, the consideration of the questions, how far the constitution of the Committees of Review may be improved, and what regulations may or should be adopted for the conduct of business in those Committees.

ROTATION OF THE CONFERENCE.

I That having respect to the peculiar circumstances of London, in regard to its extent, the number of our members, and the facilities of communication with all the suburbs, it is desirable that the Conference should more frequently hold its sessions there.

2. That the following plan of rotation, subject to such modifications as may be hereafter rendered necessary, be approved; viz., Newcastle-upon-Tyne, Camborne, Sheffield, Bristol, Bradford, Birmingham, London, Liverpool, Leeds, Manchester, Hull, Burslem, London.

PASTORAL OVERSIGHT OF THE YOUNG.

The Conference, on receiving the Report of the Special Committee appointed to consider, during the past year, the Pastoral Oversight of the Young and their Relation to the Church, resolves,—

That the Report be printed ; that a copy of it shall be sent to every Minister ; that it shall be considered in the District Meetings in May, when pastoral affairs are under review ; and that the suggestions adopted by the several District Committees in reference to the recommendations embodied in the Report shall be forwarded to the REV. GEORGE O. BATE, that he may prepare a Report thereupon for presentation to the next Conference.

LOCAL PREACHERS.

The Conference cheerfully accedes to the request of the Committee of Review of the Wesleyan Theological Institution, that it should appoint a Committee, consisting in part of Local Preachers, to meet during the year, to ascertain what means can be adopted to assist Local Preachers in preparation for their important work, and report to the next Conference.

The Committee shall consist of the following Ministers and Gentlemen, the President being authorized to add to their number at his discretion :--The President and the Secretary of the Conference, the Ex-President, the Revs. John Bond, George Bowden, Dr. James, Dr. Jobson, Thomas Nightingale, Dr. Osborn, Charles Prest, Dr. Punshon, and John Walton; with Messrs. Alexander J. Brooke, Samuel Budgett, R. Dyson, Enoch Forbes,--- Gray, George Lidgett, B.A., Thomas Pethick, William W Pocock, William H. Stephenson, William Sugden, B.A., Samuel D. Waddy, B.A., Thomas Wilshaw, William H. Walmsley, and John W. Wayman.

EXTENSION OF METHODISM IN GREAT BRITAIN.

The Conference re-appoints the Committee of last year to consider this subject, in connection with the proposal of SIR FRANCIS LYCETT and MR. W MEWBURN; viz., The President and the Secretary of the Conference, the Ex-President, the Rev. Dr. James, the Rev. Charles Prest and J. W. Greeves, and Mr. John Vanner; the Rev. John Bedford and William Edwards, and Mr. Richard Haworth; the Rev. John Farrar and Marmaduke C. Osborn, and Mr. John S. Budgett : with Sir Francis Lycett and Mr. Mewburn, and such other persons as the President may add. Should the President deem it expedient, after the preliminary consideration of this subject by this Committee, he is empowered to nominate and convene a larger Committee, to consider the proposed Plan during the year, and report to the next Conference.

AUXILIARY HOME-MISSION WORK IN THE METROPOLIS.

1. The Conference receives the Report of the Metropolitan Methodist Lay Mission, and, recognising the great need that exists for lay Mission work, and the special and pressing claims which London has upon the entire country, commends this movement to the liberal support of the whole Connexion.

2. The Conference adopts the Rules of the Metropolitan Lay Mission as revised in special session of the Committee: and directs that a Report of the Mission be presented at the Home-Missionary Committee of Review.

MANCHESTER AND SALFORD WESLEYAN LAY HOME-MISSION.

The Conference receives with much satisfaction the Report of this Mission now presented to it,—rejoices in the success which has attended the efforts put forth,—sanctions the Rules and Principles which have been submitted to its consideration, authorizes the Financial District Meeting of the Manchester District to arrange for the re-appointment of the Committee in the same manner as before, and will be glad to receive, either through the Annual Meeting of the Home Missionary Committee of Review, or otherwise, further reports of its proceedings.

INSURANCE OF PROPERTY HELD IN TRUST FOR CONNEXIONAL PURPOSES FROM FIRE

The Conference is gratified to learn that the Limited Liability Company recently formed for the Insurance of Connexional Trus: Property against loss by fire, has already attained a considerable degree of success. The Conference renews its commendation of the scheme to the support of Ministers and Trustees, and hopes that the Company may continue to realise increasing prosperity.

LAWS AFFECTING MARRIAGE.

The Conference, after considering the suggestions made to it by several District Committees, declares its judgment, that adequate provision should be made to secure a complete and uniform national registration of all marriages to be hereafter solemnized; and that there ought to be such an amendment of the laws relating thereto as would secure in all respects perfect religious equality for all denominations as to the legal conditions on which marriages shall be solemnized and recorded. The Conference further instructs the Committee of Exigency to endeavour to earry these sentiments into effect.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES ACTS.

The Conference repeats the expression of its utter disapproval of these Acts, as iniquitous in principle, and demoralising in their tendency, and its determination to use all legitimate means to seek their repeal. The Conference commends this subject to the eareful attention of the Committee of Exigency, especially in anticipation of the approach of a general election.

MISCELLANEOUS RESOLUTIONS.

1. Thanks to the retiring President.—Resolved unanimously, That the respectful and affectionate thanks of the Conference are due, and are hereby presented, to its late President, the REV. LUKE H. WISEMAN, M.A., for his eminently able, faithful, and courteous discharge of his official duties, both during the Session of the last Conference and throughout the year.

2. Thanks to the Secretary.—Resolved unanimously, That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the REV. GEORGE T. PERKS, M.A., for his able and acceptable services as the Secretary of the Conference.

3. The Ex-President's Official Sermon.—Resolved unanimously, That the eordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the Ex-President, the REV. LUKE H. WISEMAN, M.A., for the lucid, powerful, and eminently practical Sermon delivered by him in the Brunswick-place Chapel, on Sunday morning, August 3rd; and that he be requested to publish it.

4. The President's Sermon.—Resolved unanimously, That the eordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the President, the REV. GEORGE T. PERKS, M.A., for the elaborate and richly instructive Discourse delivered by him in the Brunswick-place Chapel, on Sunday evening, August 3rd; and that he be requested to publish it.

5. The Ex-President's Charge.—Resolved unanimously, That the hearty thanks of the Conference be presented to the Ex-

President, the REV. LUKE II. WISEMAN, M.A., for the comprehensive, powerful, and most seasonable Charge delivered by him to one division of the newly-ordained Ministers; and that he be earnestly requested to publish it.

6. The Rev. Dr. James' Charge.—Resolved unanimously, That the hearty thanks of the Conference be presented to the REV. JOHN H. JAMES, D.D., for the lucid, instructive, and eloquent Charge delivered by him to the second division of the newly-ordained Ministers; and that he be earnestly requested to publish it.

7. The Rev. Benjamin Gregory's Fernley Lecture.—Resolved unanimously, That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the REV BENJAMIN GREGORY for the Discourse delivered by him at the Fernley Lecture, on Tuesday evening, July 29th, a Discourse characterized by research, originality, vigour, and adaptation to our own times.

8. Suggestions from District Meetings.—It is resolved, That the Convener of the Conference Committee on Memorials from Circuits and Suggestions from District Meetings, is authorized to obtain, immediately after the Annual District Meetings, from the Secretaries of the District Committees, copies of any Suggestions which may have been made, and that nothing shall be deemed to be a Suggestion of a District Meeting but what is recorded in answer to the Question on the subject in the District Minutes.

The REV FRANCIS W GREEVES is re-appointed the Convener of the Committee referred to.

9. The Conference resolves that the period at the end of which a Minister may be allowed to return to a Circuit shall be changed from eight to six years.

10. The Conference rescinds the regulation made in 1867, that a Minister should be appointed in every District to take charge of all matters within that District affecting the financial interests of the Theological Institution.

11. The Conference resolves that in the President's circular, containing the particulars which the Superintendents of Circuits are required to furnish to the Financial Secretary, for the Annual Meeting of the District Committee, this further inquiry shall be included. What children or young people are met in classes conducted by Ministers, not being Society Classes ?

12. Burials in Churchyards.—The Conference commends this question, should it be again brought before Parliament, to the attention of the Committee of Exigency.

13. It is resolved that the Annual Meetings of the several District Committees shall be held between the 10th and the 17th of May, 1874, with the exception of the Lincoln, North Wales, South Wales, Isle of Man, and Zetland Districts.

STANDING ORDERS.

1. Home-Missionary Ministers. — (1.) At each Financial District Meeting a return shall be made, from each Circuit in which a Home-Missionary Minister is stationed, of the sum contributed by the Circuit to the Home-Mission Fund, and of the cost of such appointment to the Home-Mission Committee; according to the "Regulations for the employment of Home-Missionary Ministers" adopted by the Conference of 1859.

(2.) The Conference directs that a special inquiry shall be made at the May District Meeting, whether the Regulations for the employment of Home-Missionary Ministers, adopted by the Conference, have been faithfully observed in the Circuits to which Home-Missionary Ministers are appointed; and that aReport in each case shall be made to the Conference.

2. Candidates for Ordination.—The Conference directs that Candidates for Ordination shall, at or before the May District Meeting, preach before three Ministers of the District, who shall report to the Meeting.

3. Preachers on Trial.—(1.) The Conference, having been informed that in several Circuits the Preachers on Trial have very rarely an opportunity of receiving the Lord's Supper, resolves that, in compliance with a former injunction on this subject, the Superintendents be required to make the necessary arrangements, in their Circuit-Plans, for securing to their junior Colleagues proper facilities for partaking of this Holy Sacrament. (2.) Whenever it shall be found to be practicable, Preachers on Trial shall preach during the District Meetings.

4. Candidates for Admission on Trial.—Those Preachers who are recommended for admission on Trial shall preach in the presence of at least three of the Ministers of the District Committee, (at or about the time of its Annual Meeting in May,) to be selected by the Chairman, exclusively of the Superintendents by whom the Candidates respectively are proposed; and a special report of the Sermons shall be made in the District Meeting, and immediately forwarded in writing to the London Committee of Examination.

5. Attendance of Ministers at Official Meetings.—Mistakes having arisen on this subject, the Conference deems it proper and necessary to declare, that all the Ministers and Preachers on Trial appointed to a Circuit have a constitutional right to take part as members in our Leaders' Meetings, and in all other official meetings of the Circuits to which they are appointed.

6. Minor District Meetings.—In all cases in which the holding of a Minor District Meeting is rendered necessary, such Meeting, except under the Regulation passed by the Conference in 1840, (Minutes, Vol. IX., p. 94,) shall be held in the District in which the accused party resides, the accused and the accuser selecting respectively two Ministers from the said District, who, with the Chairman thereof, shall constitute the Minor District Meeting.

Should either party refuse or declino to choose two Ministers, to act as members of the Meeting, the Chairman is empowered and directed to nominate them, so that the number required by rule may be made up.

7. Committee on Appeals.—At each Conference, the President shall nominate, not later than the second day, a Committee of twenty-one members of the Conference, to whom shall be referred, without discussion, all cases requiring further inquiry touching the character of Ministers or Preachers on Trial, immediately after the reading of the Minutes of District Committees thereupon, or of any notice of charge or appeal relating thereto, or for any reason which the Conference may deem sufficient.

Any complainant or appellant, or any person under inquiry, may object to one in three of the members of the said Committee sitting on his case; and the President shall then appoint some other member of the Conference to act instead of the member so objected to.

Special Cases to be decided upon by the Conference may be referred to the whole Committee, but it shall, for ordinary purposes, be divided into three sections, for each of which a convener shall be appointed, who shall be responsible for preparing the business of the Committee.

8. Supply of Vacancies.—Instances having occurred in which Superintendents and other Ministers, needing Circuit-supplies on occasion of sickness and various casualties, have applied to the President of the Conference, without *first* taking counsel with the Chairman of the District; the Conference directs the brethren to return to the old plan of first communicating with the Chairman in every such case.

9. Liverpool Minutes.—The Resolutions adopted by the Conference in the year 1820, and usually called the "Liverpool Minutes," besides being read and considered in the Annual Meeting of each District Committee, (as our standing Regulations require,) shall also be read at the Weekly Meeting of Ministers in each Circuit, next following the September Quarterly Meeting; and the Chairmen of Districts are directed to make inquiry concerning the due observance of this regulation.

10. District Minutes.—The Chairmen of Districts are required to procure three complete copies of the Minutes of the several Annual and other Meetings of the District Committees, transcribed according to the order of time in which such Meetings shall have been held, and duly signed by the Chairman and Secretary. One of these copies shall be inserted in the District Records; a second shall be reserved for the use of the Chairman and Financial Secretary at the Conference; and a third shall be delivered to the Assistant-Secretaries, on the Wednesday preceding the Conference, and by them to the President during the first week of each Conference, to be preserved under his direction, as a document appertaining to the Connexion. The several copies of the last class shall be written on foolscap paper, that they may be annually bound together in one volume.

11. Annual Return of Members in Society.—The number of Members in Society, and of persons admitted on trial, as taken at the March Quarterly Visitation in each year, and reported in the Circuit Schedules presented at the District Meetings, shall be the number returned on the Minutes of the following Conference.

12. Returns of the Military in attendance at our Chapels.— The Conference directs that the returns of the Military in attendance at our Chapels shall include the actual number of soldiers who are declared Wesleyan-Methodists stationed in the Circuit, and not merely the average number in attendance at Divine Service.

13. Circuit Schedules.—In order to bring the state and progress of the work of God in every Circuit distinctly under the examination of the District Meetings, copies of the Printed Circuit Schedules, duly filled up, shall be annually produced, examined, and considered. The Chairmen of Districts are made responsible for the execution of this order. (See also Minutes for 1831, Q. xxv.; Vol. VII., p. 67.)

The Circuit Schedules containing the Returns of the Members in Society are to be forwarded, immediately after the May District Meetings, to the REV. JOHN BOND, Guilford-Street, Russell-Square, London, W.C.

The Education Schedules, having been filled up and presented to the March Quarterly Meeting, are to be sent to the District Educational Secretary, not later than April 10th.

14. Schedules and Circulars on Connexional Business.--As it is obviously desirable, that the Committees appointed by the Conference to manage the several departments of the business of the Connexion, in the intervals of its Session, should be furnished with as much statistical information as possible on the matters of business severally confided to their care, the Conference authorizes them, through their appointed Officers, to send, when they deem it expedient, suitable Circulars and Schedules to the Superintendents, or to the Chairmen of Districts, as the case may require ; and directs the Superintendents and Chairmen duly to return such Schedules properly filled up.

15. Annual Examination of Pupil-Teachers in Religious Knowledge.—The Conference directs that the Annual Examination of Pupil-Teachers in Religious Knowledge shall be held on the first Saturday in March; that the questions shall be prepared by the General Committee ; that the Examination shall be held, either in the several Circuits by the Superintendent Ministers or their Colleagues, or at suitable places for Central District Examinations, as may be determined by the September District Meetings, and agreed to by the respective School Committees ; and that the written answers shall be forwarded to the General Secretary, and shall be valued by a Central Board of Examiners to be elected by the General Committee. The Conference further recommends that, in connection with Central Examinations, Meetings of Teachers and Pupil-Teachers be held under the direction of the Chairman of the District and the District Educational Secretary.

16. Lay-Members of Connexional Committees.--(1.) At the Annual Meeting of each District Committee in Great Britain, one Gentleman, being a member of the Society, shall be chosen by the Lay-Members of the District Committee, to be a member of the Committee of the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund, held preparatory to the Conference; and the Gentleman so ehosen shall have the right to attend, and take part in the proceedings of, the Annual Meetings of the Missionary Committee, the Schools' Committee, the Chapel Committee, the Theological Institution Committee, and the Education Committee, held preparatory to the Conference.

(2.) In respect to the several Committees of the Connexional Funds, it is resolved, that a certain number of Lay Gentlemen shall retire annually by rotation, the same persons being incligible for immediate re-election, except in special cases.

17. Lay-Members of District Committees to be summoned by the Chairman.—It is resolved, That, in future, the Chairmen of Districts shall be required to send a circular to the Lay-Members of the District Committee, requesting their attendance on the Wednesday, and, if necessary, on the Thursday, in the week of the Annual District Meeting, specifying the business that will be brought forward, and particularly mentioning any subject that may have been particularly remitted by the Conference to the consideration of such Meeting. A similar circular shall be prepared and sent with reference to the Financial District Meeting.

In order to the carrying out of this Resolution, the Superintendents of Circuits are required to furnish the Chairman of the District with the names and addresses of the Circuit Stewards immediately after the December Quarterly Meeting.

18. Representative to the Stationing Committee.—The Minister who shall be the Representative of each District to the Stationing Committee shall be chosen by the united votes of the Ministers and Laymen who are members of the District Committee.

19. Division of Circuits.--Before District Committees consent to the division of any Circuit, inquiry must be made whether due attention has been paid to satisfactory arrangements for the Trust-Estates affected by the proposed division, especially in reference to any debts existing thereon.

20. Quarterly Fast-Days. — The days upon which the Quarterly Fast, appointed by Rule, is to be observed throughout the Connexion, for the following year, are, Fridays, October 3rd, December 26th, March 27th, and June 26th.

21. Rule of 1797 concerning Admission of Members.— Mistakes having occasionally arisen respecting the meaning of the Rule of 1797, on the subject of the admission of persons who are on trial as members of our Society, the Conference deems it necessary to repeat the statement, That it never was intended that the names of all those who are on trial should be laid before a Leaders' Meeting for distinct and formal discussion; but solely, that if there be, in the opinion of a Leader, any reasonable objection to the character and conduct of any person who is on trial, such objection may be stated by him; and that, if the validity of the objection be established to the satisfaction of the Meeting, a Member's Ticket shall not be given to the person, so objected to, at the Quarterly Visitation.

22. Trial of Members.—When a charge is brought against any Member resident in a place where no Leaders' Meeting is statedly held, the case shall be referred for investigation to the Leaders' Meeting of the principal Society in the Circuit Town. The Leader or Leaders, and the Society Stewards, of the Society of which the accused is a member, shall be associated with the Leaders' Meeting for the purposes of the investigation.

If the accused person is a Trustee, then there shall also be associated with the Leaders' Meeting, as above constituted, the Trustees of the Chapel with which the Society of which he is a member is connected; or, if there is no such Chapel, then the Trustees of the Chapel in connection with the principal Society in the Circuit Town. But no Trustee shall, in either case, be so associated, unless he is himself a Member of Society in the same Circuit.

23. Reading of the Pastoral Address in Society Meetings.— The Superintendents are directed to appoint special Society Meetings to be held at the principal Chapels in their Circuits, for the purpose of having the Pastoral Address read, and made the subject of suitable remarks and exhortations.

24. Contingent Fund.—In future, all payments on account of Ordinary Deficiencies shall be made through the medium of the Financial Secretaries of Districts. The payments on account of Home Missionaries are to be made directly to and by the Treasurers of the Fund.

25. The Army.—The Chairmen of Districts are directed to inquire of the Superintendents of Circuits in which troops are marched to Divine Service in our chapels, the average number of non-commissioned officers and men in attendance; distinguishing the number of members in Society. These returns must include, also, the actual number of soldiers who are declared Wesleyan-Methodists. The returns given are to be recorded in the District Minutes. If there be no military attendance in the District, a note to that effect shall be inserted.

26. Conference Plan.—The Superintendents of those Circuit: in which the Conference may from year to year assemble, shall, with the previous approbation of the President, (as already required by rule,) complete and print, not later than the 15th day of June in each year, a Plan of the order of preaching in the principal chapels during the Session of the Conference; and shall also, on or before the above date, inform every person whom they have appointed to preach in those chapels, of the time and place of such appointment. And in order that the Plan thus prepared may not be violated, to the disappointmen: of our friends, and to the great inconvenience of other parties concerned, no Minister who attends the Conference shall be at liberty to make an engagement to preach in any other Circuit, either on the Sabbath, or on any other day, during the period appointed for the meeting of the Conference, or of its various Preparatory Committees, at the time for which his name shall be inserted on the Conference Plan.

27 The Chairmen of Districts are enjoined to make particular inquiries at their Annual Meetings in reference to all the points of Discipline specified in the first Article of the Answer $\approx Q$, xxviii, in the *Minutes* of 1825.

The Private Subscriptions and Public Collections for the New Kingswood and Woodhouse Grove Schools, etc., are to be made in the early part of the month of November, 1873; and the amount, without any deduction on account of Educational Allowances to Children, is to be immediately remitted to the Rev. Frederick Payne, Bryn-yr-Haul, Mold, Flintshire, one of the General Sccretaries for the Schools' Fund. All sums due on account of daughters at the Schools must also be sent to Mr. Payne. Each Superintendent must also send to Mr. Payne a particular account of the sums contributed to the Fund, and of all claims for Educational Allowances in his Circuit, specifying distinctly the names of the children for whose education the claims are made, the date, year, and place of their birth, and the exact number of years during which the allowance has been received.

3. The Annual Subscriptions, due January 1st, and occasional Donations, for the Wesleyan Theological Institution, are to be solicited in every Circuit in the first or second week of January, 1874; and forthwith remitted to the Rev. John Farrar, Headingley, Leeds. Post-Office Orders are to be made payable in Leeds. The Public Collection for the Theological Institution is also to be remitted to the Rev. John Farrar.

4. The Annual Public Collections for the General Chapel Fund are to be made, and Subscriptions solicited, in the month of February, 1874; and the whole amount should be immediately remitted to the Rev. Messrs. Edwards and Tindall, General Secretaries, Oldham-Street Chapel, Manchester.

5. The Yearly Collection in all the Classes is to be made, as usual, at the March Visitation; and the money is to be paid at the District Meetings in May.

6. The Private Subscriptions and Public Collections for the Wesleyan Education Fund are to be made in the month of April. 1874; and the money is to be paid, at or before the May District Meeting, to the Financial Secretaries, and by them remitted, with the Circuit Lists, to the Rev. Theophilus Woolmer, Selborne Villa, Wickham-Road, Lewisham-Road, London, S.E. 7. The Private Subscriptions for the Mission-Fund are to be received in all our Circuits, either weekly, monthly, quarterly, or annually, as is most convenient to the Subscribers. The annual Public Collections for that Fund are to be made in all our Chapels, and other preaching-places, at the time of the Anniversaries of the several Auxiliary or Branch Societies; or, where no Public Meetings of that kind are held, in the month of May. 8. The Private Subscriptions for the Auxiliary Worn-out Ministers' and Widows' Fund are to be solicited in the month of May, 1874; and a list of Subscriptions is to be sent to the Secretary, the Rev. Henry H. Chettle, *Woodhouse Grove*, *Apperley-Bridge*, *near Leeds*, not later than the 30th of June. (See *Minutes* of 1851, Q. XXVIII., Vol. XI., p. 666.) 9. THE ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE TO THE METHODIST SOCIETIES.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,

To address you, according to our annual custom, is not the least pleasing duty to which, amidst the engagements of a busy session, we willingly apply ourselves. We feel increasingly the closeness and sacredness of our mutual relation, and the solemn importance of the responsibilities which we sustain towards you. "Are not ye our work in the Lord ? If we be not apostles unto others, yet doubtless we are to you; for the seal of our apostleship are ye in the Lord."

Think not, dear brethren, that the sending of a written Pastoral constitutes the whole share which you have in our deliberations. You are contemplated, more or less, in the whole of our business, not excepting those affairs which are considered purely ministerial. In the scrutiny to which we submit our own character and work, regard is had to your claim to a blameless and Scriptural Ministry. In the care taken in the admission of probationers to the full work and office of the Christian pastorate, and in the examination of candidates, we aim at giving you the best guarantee possible that the men to whom we commit the sacred trust previously committed to ourselves are "faithful men, able to teach others also." And so, in relation to the several departments into which, for purposes of administration, our great work is divided, we can truly say that, subordinately to God's glory, the well-being of our people is the end of all. Your interests are so interwoven with our ordinary business, that you necessarily influence our thoughts and feelings to a large extent.

The review of the year, if not satisfactory in all particulars, presents much that is gratifying in connection with the work of God. The increase of members in Great Britain, after supplying the large vacancies occasioned by death and other causes, is one thousand seven hundred and thirty While grateful to Him who give th the increase for this augmentation of our numbers, and for the many thousands more who must have been brought into fellowship with us before any numerical advance could be reported, yet considering the vastness of our agencies, and the much larger additions of some past years, it must be acknowledged with regret that the present increase is not considerable. Still, we are persuaded, dear brethren, that neither you nor we have laboured in vain, or spent our strength for naught. We believe that, in addition to the tabulated results, there are effects • The produced which are beyond the domain of statistics. Day " only will declare the blessings received in our congregations under the ministry of the Divine Word, and in our classmeetings, in the exercise of Christian fellowship. At the same time we would not, in the absence of tangible results, have you or ourselves to be content with the merely inappreciable and unseen. Believing in a visible Church, we look, not unreasonably, for visible members. The prosperity which we desire, and for which we urge you to work and pray, is that of the times of Pentecost, when "the Lord added to the Church daily such as should be saved."

In regard to our Foreign Missions the year in some respects has been remarkable. The largest income ever raised by the Wesleyan-Methodist Missionary Society has been reported : and a long-standing debt which embarrassed the Society's operations has been completely extinguished. The numerical increase of members shown in the returns indicates that our great work in foreign lands is carried on with zeal and success. But that which will make our present gathering memorable is the first appearance amongst us of an Italian brother, himself the fruit

of our Mission to Italy, who preaches the Gospel with the tongue of a native to them "which are at Rome also." We thank God that the Divine blessing rests upon our new mission to the city of the Cæsars and the Popes, and that, notwithstanding its pagan and Papal associations, the work of God within its walls is full of promise and hope.

Our Home-Missionary operations are capable of almost indefinite development, both in towns and country-places. If we had the means of multiplying our agencies, a rich harvest would certainly be reaped. An effort, auxiliary to our regular Home Missions, has been commenced in London by the employment of lay agents to meet, to some extent, the peculiar requirements of the metropolis. But we are persuaded that, in addition to all salaried agencies, the necessities of the country demand the united labours of the whole of God's Church. This new organization, however widely extended, would be no blessing, if it led our people to leave all evangelistic work to those specially separated to it. Brethren, the Lord hath need of every one of you; and it is only by the self-denying and persevering toil of every one that the mission of Methodism-the spreading of Scriptural holiness throughout the land-can be completely fulfilled. On this matter of working for God, we confess that we are in doubt of some of you. Of brethren who stand all the day idle, we would ask :---Where is your pity for the perishing? Where your valour for the truth? Where your zeal for God?

The work of chapel-building has been carried on during the last twelve months upon the extensive scale of recent years. This kind of progress we know is sometimes spoken of, half disparagingly, as "material prosperity." But the material does not necessarily exclude the spiritual. We may have the Shekinah within the temple ; and showers of blessing too copious to be contained may not fall until the Lord of hosts is proved by the bringing of all the tithes into His storehouse. With an admitted deficiency in the country in church and chapel accommodation, we cannot but rejoice in the multiplication of places of worship in which the pure Gospel will be preached, and which to succeeding generations will prove, we doubt not, centres of spiritual influence and power.

With regard to education, it is gratifying to be able to inform you that, notwithstanding the controversies of the day, and the effects which recent legislation must have upon pre-existing schools, our own Training Colleges and Day-schools are sustained in general vigour and efficiency, and in undiminished number. Upon our Sunday-school system, in connection with which not a few of you are usefully engaged, we are bestowing increased attention. To augment its power for good we have projected a plan for a Connexional Sunday-School Union, from the operation of which we expect good results. Nor are we indifferent to the

"intermediate" and the "higher" education. We are anxious that the children of our people should be able to pursue knowledge with as little damage as possible to their spiritual interests; and that at Oxford, the earliest home of Methodism, or at Cambridge or any other university, they should be surrounded by every safeguard which pastoral and parental solicitude can supply. How best to accomplish this end is a question to which we are anxious to find a practical solution.

Beloved brethren, as the years pass away we are reminded that we are removed further and further from the times of our first fathers in this ministry. This thought recurs with additional impressiveness as new names are inscribed upon our death-roll. It is some years since the last survivor of Wesley's own preachers passed to his reward : and now, by the decease of a renerated father, whose ministry dates from the fourth year of the present century, we are warned that other links are breaking, and that those of ourselves who had for earlier colleagues some who had been the later associates of our Founder, are becoming fewer and fewer in number. With the memories and traditions of the past waning dimmer and weaker through the lapse of time, it is neither unnecessary nor unwise to inquire whether the work of God called Methodism has been warped from its original course by the new hands to which its direction has been necessarily committed. With the sad lessons of ecclesiastical history before us, such an inquiry cannot be deemed inappropriate.

An accurate knowledge of the Connexion enables us to say, with gratitude to God, that Methodism is, as it ever has been, a living, spiritual, evangelical power. A comparison with the past yields us much satisfaction. The doctrines taught by the early Methodist Preachers are at this day "those things which are most surely believed among us," and believed with unbroken unanimity. Whatever be our reproach, it is not that of holding conflicting views, or of bewildering our congregations with contradictory teachings. And as to the spiritual life of the Connexion, ye, brethren, the members of our Churches, are the subjects of that life, and ought to know something of its condition. We are aware, of course, that it exists amongst you in different degrees, from the feeble pulsations of a weakly piety to the full vigour of spiritual manhood. That our Societies, upon the whole, are not an aggregation of dead but of living This may be clurches, there is abundant evidence to show. asserted whilst the admission is made that there have been periods in our Connexional history more prosperous than the present; when the life-giving Spirit was more plentifully bestowed : when the Word preached was more overwhelmingly powerful; when meetings for prayer and public worship were more largely attended by more earnest crowds; and when institutions, services, and people were more fully instinct with spiritual life.

than appears to be the case in many instances now. On the other hand, it would not be impossible to find periods in our denominational annals marked by suspicion, dissension, and other evils unknown to our own more peaceful times; periods also which, in intelligent and consistent piety, and in examples of holy living, can scarcely be said to be equal to the present. What, then, we and you want, dear brethren, is not another life, but "more abundant" vigour of the life which we already have; not another Spirit, but a richer baptism of that Spirit a measure of which we already possess. "Now the Lord is that Spirit : and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty."

A more exalted spiritual life would show itself in an increased desire for Christian intercourse. The religion of the glorified in heaven, according to the intimations of Scripture, is eminently social; and when the Church below approaches most nearly in holiness and joyousness of feeling to the Church above, the result is seen amongst the saints in the increased closeness and constancy of holy fellowship. When a Church declines in spiritual life, there is a corresponding loss of appetite for Christian communion. To a man unblessed with experimental piety, opportunities for intercommunion of thought, and the disclosure of inner religious feeling, appear unnecessary and undcsirable. On the other hand, it is a good indication of spiritual prosperity when the believer, yearning for sympathy, calls upon all who fear the Lord to listen whilst he declares what God has done for his soul. In nothing did Methodism meet the urgent need of the regenerated heart more than in the provision which it made for intimate religious fellowship. During its earlier days, as during the earlier days of Christianity, there was a continuing in "fellowship," as well as in "the Apostles' doctrine," and "in breaking of bread, and in prayers." And if, brethren, our Church-system is to descend undamaged to posterity, it must not only be by the uncorrupted preservation of our doctrines, but by the perpetuation of the simple institution to which our fathers gave the unpretending, unecclesiastical name of "classmeeting;" in which the social elements of our sanctified nature are called into hallowed exercise, thought is interchanged, and sympathy and help mutually given and received. God forbid that our Churches, ceasing to be households resounding with the cheerful conversation of familiar voices, should be changed into cemeteries where death and silence reign, -where even the living few are mutes and mourners, and where the stillness is broken only by the voice of one solitary man !

The distance which separates our times from those of our Founder is suggestive of the immense difference between the England of 1740 and the England of 1873. We have evidence of alteration in the increase of population, in the growth of cities and towns, in the development of industrial resources, in

the augmentation and wide distribution of wealth, in methods of locomotion, in the general spread of physical comforts, and in the unintermitting stimulus applied to the public mind by a cheap press. The result is, that men live at so rapid a rate. the mind is so constantly excited by the endless succession of subjects hurrying through it, that habits of reflection can scarcely be formed, and a thoughtful, meditative piety becomes difficult. The high pressure at which business is carried on. and the multiplication of all kinds of engagements, are unfavourable to devotional retirement and attendance on the week-night means of grace. The principle of organization applied to philanthropy, intellectual improvement, recreation, amusement, and a hundred other objects, tells in the same way. Many institutions, never designed to come into competition with our week-night services, nevertheless do present counter-attractions which draw away from chapels and class-rooms not a few of the lukewarm and the young. Need we add, beloved brethren, that the plea of promoting intellectual culture, or even philanthropic work, cannot justify the "forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is"?

Amongst the altered customs of the people, that of the removal of their residence by influential families from the centre to the suburbs of large towns, however excusable or even commendable in itself, has acted in some instances prejudicially to the interests of religion. Old enapels, some of them of hallowed • associations, have been left struggling with diminished eongregations, and these made up largely of one class, --- the very poor. On the other hand, some suburban congregations are so distant from the quarters inhabited by the indigent, that wealthy members of them have little opportunity of showing kindness to fellow-worshippers in poverty, and of spreading amongst the poor, by efforts of their own, the blessings of the Gospel,work which the Lord Jesus referred to as one proof of His own Messiahship. Not a few families, moreover, have been lost to us altogether by this modern custom. Drawn to pleasant neighbourhoods by such considerations as salubrity and respectability, they have suffered serious spiritual loss in passing from localities where religious advantages abound to places where there are few or none. Is it not deplorable and strange that families professing godliness should not, in selecting a new home, consider first and foremost the soul's health ? And yet, in the migratory tendencies of the age, an aggressive evangelism should find an incentive to zeal and liberality in chapel-extension and Home-Missionary work ; so that it may become difficult for any of our members, be they merchants, artisans, miners, or agriculturists, to find themselves, wherever they go, at a considerable distance from a Methodist ehapel and a Methodist class.

The age in which we live, dear brethren, requires from us vigilance in watching against errors, and earnestness in living and working for God. There are two forms of error which diverge from the truth in opposite directions,-the unbelief of speculation, and the misbelief of superstition; forms of evil which existed in the times of our Lord, and which are contemporary still. The disciples of Jesus have as much need as ever to be warned against "the leaven of the Sadducees," and "the leaven of the Pharisees." Speculation, never very modest, has reached in our day a perfection of audacity in dogmatising upon things "too wonderful" for the minds of men. Rationalism has united the heresies of science with the heresies of theology in attacking the very foundations of the Christian faith. At the same time, an extensive revival of superstition furnishes humiliating evidence that culture and advanced civilization afford no certain guarantees against the retrogression of the human mind in the direction of idolatry.

The progress of Popish doctrines and practices in this country is awakening serious apprehensions in the minds of not a few sagacious observers of current events. With regard to Roman Catholicism proper, although it has been greatly extended in England through Irish immigration, yet, taking the United Kingdom upon the whole, it would be difficult to prove that it has increased in numbers, relatively to the greatly-increased population, or to its own numerical condition thirty years ago. And if it be true that there are not more Roman Catholics in Great Britain and Ireland now than then, why, it may be asked, should the audacious demands of the Romish hierarchy for exceptional privileges be listened to? Why should this particular sect have concessions made to it, which Methodist and Nonconformist Churches do not ask for themselves, and which the Roman Catholic governments of Europe persistently refuse to yield to the priesthood ?

There is another enemy to truth and liberty, more to be dreaded than the historic foe which gives open and honest allegiance to the Pope. This more insidious and treacherous adversary is the Popery which has arisen of late years within the pale of Protestantism, and which, occupying the vantage which it possesses as a power within the National Church, is employing many of the pulpits of the Establishment, and much of its rich revenues, in endeavouring to undo the work of the Reformation and lead the country back to Rome. We invite you, brethren, to co-operate with us in witnessing for God's truth against this dishonest party, and in resisting, as best we can, this anti-Scriptural movement. Let us encourage our brethren of the Church of England who are faithful to the Gospel of Christ, and who stand by the national Protestantism, in the efforts which they make against the spread of Sacerdotalism, with its superstitious mass and demoralizing confessional. We especially ask you to oppose this evil by outworking its agents in Home-Missionary operations. Let the women of Methodism show that, without the organization and garb of Romish or Anglican sisterhoods, or the severance of social ties, they can devote time, talents, and personal efforts to the service of Christ and to the benefit of souls.

Against the many social and insidious vices of the day, von are called upon to watch, and witness, and work. Worldliness, stimulated by the trading activities of this prosperous country, and its abounding facilities for making haste to be rich, is the great sin of the age. The love of amusement was, perhaps, never more general than it is now. In combination with intense and eager worldliness there is found an excessive levity, with a literature of its own,—the literature of frivolity With enlarged resources there has come increased luxury in living; and, it is to be feared, an increase of the giant evil of intemperance. To this national sin, and the means for remedying it, we are giving anxious attention. We need scarcely remind you that, from the earliest periods of our Connexional history, Methodist. has been strongly on the side of sobriety, and has discountenanced intemperance and the habits that lead to it. We are resolved, in the interests of the national morals, to renew our vigilance in this matter, and to use every effort to arrest the progress of drunkenness, and to preserve the sober against falling into this most degrading form of sin.

In conclusion, brethren, we urge you to cultivate personal religion. Let no public questions, however important in themselves, or Church-work, however praiseworthy, ever divert you from this. Alas for those who, while rendering public service to patriotism, to philanthropy, to religion, have forgotten the culture of their own hearts, and must bewailingly acknowledge at the last, "They made me the keeper of the vineyards; but mine own vineyard have I not kept !" For our own part we are determined to dedicate ourselves anew to our Divine Master and His work, and to seek to have constantly the presence of the Holy Spirit. We invite our people to join us in this. The harmonions and blessed Conference we have had is, we trust. the carnest of a prosperous year. That it may be so is, we are sure, the wish of all of you. And now, beloved, "seeing ye have purified your souls in obeying the truth through the Spirit unto unfeigned love of the brethren, see that ye love one another with a pure heart fervently ; being born again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the Word of God, which liveth and abideth for ever For all flesh is as grass, and all the glory of man as the flower of grass. The grass withereth, and the flower thereof falleth away : but the Word of the Lord endureth for ever. And this is the Word which by the Gospel is preached unto you."

THE ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE IRISH CONFERENCE, 1873, TO THE BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1873.

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

MET again by the gracious Providence of God in our annual Conference, we embrace the opportunity of conveying to you our sentiments of fraternal love and esteem. In availing ourselves of this privilege, we heartily reciprocate the many kind expressions of sympathy and affection contained in your Reply to our last Address. The more frequent our interchange of thought and personal intercourse, the more apparent is our Connexional unity, and our mutual determination to "hold fast in faith and love which is in Christ Jesus," that "form of sound words" which by the grace of God has been committed to us.

We heartily unite with you in giving thanks unto God that "every department of His work committed to your care is in great prosperity," both at home and in the ever-widening field of your Foreign Mission work. It gave us much pleasure to learn that so considerable a portion of the material wealth bestowed by "the Author of every good and perfect gift" upon your highly-favoured country, is being consecrated to the service of Him "who, though He was rich, for our sakes became poor, that we through His poverty might be rich." The recent extension of your chapel and school accommodation evinces the generous philanthropy of your people, and the large share you. are taking in the spiritual instruction and moral elevation of the rapidly-increasing population of your great metropolis, and of your large provincial towns. The deep searchings of heart occasioned by a small decrease of membership in a few of your Circuits have been already followed, in answer to humble confession and earnest prayer to "the Lord of the harvest," by the fulfilment of His promise, "They that sow in tears shall reap in joy. He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him."

From your knowledge of the difficulties with which we have

to contend, you will be gratified to learn that an encouraging measure of success has been granted to the labours of our brethren throughout the kingdom during the past year. The great Head of the Church has graciously answered the importunate prayers of His servants, and many of our Societies and congregations have had special "times of refreshing from the presence of the Lord." Notwithstanding the continuous decrease of our population, by emigration, as shown in the late Government census, we have had a small addition to our membership. The increased liberality of our people in their contributions to our Connexional Funds, and especially to our Home Mission and Contingent Fund, affords ample evidence of their due appreciation of our ordinances and means of grace, and of their carnest desire to take their full share in the evangelization of this still comparatively benighted land.

The question of National Education continues to have a large share of public attention on this side of the Channel, as well as on yours. The Ultramontane party in the Romish Church, though hitherto unsuccessful, still persists in demands that, if once conceded, would be subversive of our well-adapted National System of Primary Instruction, and productive of evil, the extent of which it is impossible for us to calculate. We have therefore to thank you for the kind consideration given to a Resolution of ours on the subject, submitted to your Conference of last year, and for the record in relation to it inserted in your published Minutes.

The arrangements made respecting the Auxiliary Fund, between your Committee and our Representatives, to whom we gave full powers to treat with you, are to us very satisfactory. For a time, the pressure on our limited resources may be somewhat felt; but we have confidence in the generous sympathy of our people, that, when the circumstances of the ministers who are worn out, and the widows of those who have died, in the service of our Church, are made fully known, they will not be permitted to suffer in consequence. Our hesitation at first, or rather, the hesitation of many of our brethren, was not so much from fear of any pecuniary loss or disadvantage, as from jealousy lest, even in appearance, the bond of our ecclesiastical union should be weakened.

Politics and religion are so closely related in this country, that the results of recent legislation have brought out more prominently into view our denominational distinctions. The Romish hierarchy no longer conceal their pretensions to absolute dominion over the conscience and intellect both of their clergy and laity; and the testimony they have lately given, before the highest legal tribunals of the land, confesses to an organization of their Church that must be regarded by every enlightened and unprejudiced mind as a great conspiracy against the liberties of

mankind, both civil and religious. We have also to lament, with you, that Romish thought is not confined to the pale of the Roman Catholic Church. Nevertheless, we believe that the great heart of Protestantism in this country is yet sound, and that the ecclesiastical changes which have lately taken place will greatly tend to the maintenance of its soundness. Our own position as a Church, and our sphere of operation, are more clearly defined. The apostolic and self-denying labours of our early fathers are almost universally admitted to have been instrumental, under God, in a great revival of His work, and in preserving, through the more remote districts of the South and West, the very name of Protestantism from utter extinction. There are many, it is true, ready to acknowledge this, who, at the same time, say that our work is done, and that the future evangelization of this land may be safely left to the older communities whose spiritual activities we have awakened; but in our judgment the mission of Methodism is scarcely well begun, and in no former period of its history was the field of its operations so extensive and promising.

In the work of general education we follow you with slow and distant steps, on account of the means at our disposal being so limited. In the department of higher education we have been comparatively more successful. The Methodist College in Belfast, though only a few years in existence, has more than met the most sanguine expectations of its original promoters. We regret very much that it must now lose the services of its able and devoted Principal. In the discharge of his onerous duties, Dr. Robert Crook has suffered in health, and requires a season of leisure for its restoration. He is succeeded in the office of Principal by the Rev. Robinson Scott, D.D., whose long experience of educational work insures the continued efficiency of the College. The Connexional School in Dublin, under the able management of the Rev. T. A. M'Kee, Governor and Chaplain, still retains the high reputation long accorded to it; but the house-accommodation is insufficient, and the premises are unsuitable for its enlargement and adaptation to the present wants of the Institution. A new site, in every way suitable, has been sccured, and we have given our sanction to the Trustees to apply for subscriptions towards a new and appropriate erection.

The zealous interest that our people have always taken in our Foreign Missions remains unabated, and the arrival of your Deputation from year to year initiates a season of religious festival. Several of our English brethren on the Deputation this year have been welcomed as old and highly-esteemed friends, and without exception the services of all have been greatly valued and successful.

Our obituary list this year is, thank God, comparatively short, but it contains two names that have been long with us "household words." Thomas Waugh, though for a number of years unable from advanced age and physical infirmity to take any part in our Connexional affairs, has had for a long period so distinguished a place amongst us, and has been personally and by character so well known to you, that we need only say here the

character so well known to you, that we need only say here that he died at his residence in Bandon, in great peace, and has left us a memory worthy of all honour. Daniel Macafee was also no common man. For a number of years previous to his decease he resided in London; and, as has been communicated to us, departed thence to his heavenly reward in the full "triumph of faith." He was, throughout his active ministerial life, a master in our Israel, and by his latest work, "The Pillar and Ground of the Truth," he "though dead yet speaketh."

The Rev. Luke II. Wiseman, M.A., our honoured President, and the esteemed brethren whom you have appointed with him to represent you in our Conference, received from us, as it was meet. a hearty welcome. Our beloved President has been long known to many of us personally, and to us all by reputation, as a faithful and able minister of Christ, but his presence and intercourse with us have greatly endeared him to all hearts. The Ex-President, the Rev. John H. James, D.D., and the Rev. Gervase Smith, M.A., have been cordially greeted as old and highlyvalued friends, whom we are always glad to see and hear. The Rev. William B. Pope, though on his first visit, has no longer , any reason to regard himself as a stranger. Highly gifted, and ready to communicate, he has laid us under great and lasting obligations. These distinguished brethren, by their pulpit ministrations, rich in evangelical doctrine, and replete with practical instruction, have largely contributed to the edification of ourselves, as well as the crowded congregations that attended every service.

We have appointed the Rev. George Vance, nominated as Delegate, the Rev. William G. Price, and the Rev. John D. Powell, as our Representatives in your Conference; and we have also appointed the Rev. Wallace M'Mullen to attend its sittings, with special reference to the completion of the arrangements concerning the Auxiliary Fund which were under consideration last year. These respected brethren have our entire confidence, and, well acquainted with all our affairs, they will be able and ready to give you any further information that may be desired.

We are about to close our Conference, which we regard as one of the happiest and most encouraging in our remembrance. With the utmost freedom of speech, "brotherly kindness" has never been forgotten, and with a willingness to adapt ourselves in our Connexional usages and administration to the varied circumstances that arise, there has been no disposition to alter or efface the old landmarks set up by our fathers. We separate to our several spheres of labour resolved, in prayerful reliance upon 1873.

Him who has promised to the under-shepherds of His flock to be "with them alway, even unto the end of the world,"

"To labour on at God's command, And offer all our works to Him."

THE ANSWER OF THE BRITISH CONFERENCE, 1873, TO THE ADDRESS OF THE IRISH CONFERENCE OF 1873.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,

YOUR welcome Address was read, as usual, at the opening of our Conference; and was heard with feelings of grateful satisfaction. We accept with thankfulness your renewed expressions of attachment and confidence, and rejoice that we are able to respond to them in similar terms. We are one with you, not only in our common origin, our doctrines, our aims, and our form of Church-organization, but also in brotherly affection; and we cannot doubt that this truest and fairest bond of union will continue to be jealously maintained.

We thank you for your congratulations in regard to those forms of external prosperity which we felt it right to point out in our Reply to your last Address, as signs of the approbation and blessing of God. You will be gratified to hear that each of the departments of our work to which we then referred has been marked during the past year by the same steady progress. On the building and enlargement of chapels and schools, and the reduction of debts on Connexional property, there has been expended the extraordinary sum of $\pounds 309,593$. Sanction has been given by our Chapel Committee to the erection of one hundred and thirty-five new chapels, which, with the additional accommodation provided by enlargements, supply thirty-five thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight sittings, being, it is calculated, "about one in seven of the average annual increase of the population of England, Scotland and Wales." In the Metropolis six new chapels have been opened during the year, others are in progress, and suitable sites have been secured for the erection of many more. The "Provincial Fund," in aid of this necessary work has reached the noble sum of nearly £64,500. Through the painstaking and well-directed exertions of our beloved Secretary, the Rev.

Gervase Smith, M.A., aided by the Rev Dr. Punshon, arrangements have been made by which the debt on the Westminster Chapel will be happily extinguished. In all this, as affording additional scope and facilities for our labours, and as implying the willing consecration of wealth to God on the part of our people, we find cause of devout thankfulness; and we carnestly look for the fulfilment of those great words, "Prove Me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it."

Nor are we without encouragement with reference to results of a more spiritual character. Our congregations are large and attentive; in many places there have been gracious awakenings and ingatherings into our Societies; and, after making all deductions of losses through deaths and other causes, we find a net increase of one thousand seven hundred and thirty members, with more than twenty thousand persons on trial. We are far from regarding these results with feelings of complacency, as all that should have been expected from our vast and manifold agency amongst an increasing population; but they assure us that God is in the midst of us, and impart to us a fresh stimulus to exertion.

Efforts have been made during the year to promote the greater efficiency of our Sunday-schools, and a plan has been prepared for the formation of a Connexional Sunday-School Union. The aggregate number of children in our Sunday-schools is nearly seven hundred thousand.

The question of elementary Day-schools continues of necessity to engross our attention ; and, following your example, a schetce has been under our consideration for the advancement of higher education. This subject has occupied much of the time of our Conference ; important resolutions have been adopted with reference to it, and a Committee appointed for carrying them into effect.

We rejoice with you over the prosperity with which you have been favoured. Considering the peculiar difficulties by which you are beset, and the continuous thinning of your population by emigration, it is matter of fervent thanksgiving to God that you not only retain your position, but extend your borders and multiply the membership of your Societies. Your evangelistic labours were never more urgently required. These outside observers to whom you refer, who, while they admit that the labours of your fathers were mainly instrumental in conserving the interests of Protestantism in your Island, assert that the work of Methodism is now done, have strangely misconceived the purposes of God in regard to it. In your truer judgment, "the mission of Methodism is scarcely well begun, and in no period of its history was the field of its operations so extensive and promising." The harvest truly is plenteous. A great and effectual door is open before you, which you will not be slow to enter, though there are many adversaries.

We feel it to be of the utmost importance that your National System of Primary Education should be maintained, as a safeguard against the encroachments of Romanism; and we re-affirm our determination to "oppose, by the use of every legitimate means in our power," every attempt to subvert that system.

Your own institutions for promoting higher education have long been objects of our admiration. We have heard with gratitude and joy of the remarkable success of the College in Belfast; and are most glad to learn that the prosperity which has been given to the older Connexional school in Dublin, has rendered it necessary for you to procure more commodious premises. Providence has guided you to the choice of a suitable site for this purpose, and we cannot doubt that necessary funds will be provided for its accomplishment.

We are gratified to find that the arrangements recently made between your Representatives and the Committee of the Auxiliary Fund are satisfactory to you. We should deeply regret if this method of simplifying the administration of the Fund should have the effect of reducing the already scanty allowances made to your aged brethren and their widows, or of slackening the ties of brotherhood between you and ourselves; but we cannot suppose either of these evil consequences to be possible. Our relation to each other will remain unchanged, and your confidence in the sympathy and liberality of your people will be found, in this as in other respects, to have been well placed.

We lament with you over your losses by death. The venerable Thomas Waugh and Daniel Macafee had ceased to be present at our annual gatherings, but it was pleasant to us to think of them as still brightening their immediate circles by their happy old age. Their obituaries have called forth, from our brethren who best knew them, many testimonies of regard and affection for their memory. In our own list of the departed are included this year the names of our beloved father, Thomas Jackson, and of that judicious and successful missionary, William Shaw; as well as of many honoured brethren who have been taken from us in the midst of their days, to some of whom we had fondly looked for continued and successful service. We have listened to the story of their death with subdued sorrow mingled with gladness, and have renewed our resolutions to work while it is day.

Your esteemed Representatives, the Rev. George Vance, the Rev. William G. Price, and the Rev. John D. Powell, have been cordially welcomed by us, not only because they come in your name, but in consideration of their personal character; and we thank you for the special mission of the Rev. Wallace M'Mullen. His explanations in reference to the Auxiliary Fund, and the Address of the Rev. George Vance, have been heard with respectful attention.

We have appointed the Rev. Luke H. Wiseman, M.A., Ex-President, the Rev. Gervase Smith, M.A., the Secretary of our Conference, and the Rev. Dr. James, to accompany our beloved and honoured President, the Rev. George T. Perks, M.A., on his visit to you at your next Conference.

And now, dear brethren, we again commend you to God and the Word of His grace. May the course of prosperity on which you have again entered brighten more and more! May you and we alike approve ourselves as the ministers of God, "by pureness, by knowledge, by long-suffering, by kindness, by the Holy Ghost, by love unfeigned, by the Word of truth, by the power of God, by the armour of righteousness on the right hand and on the left"! "And when the Chief Shepherd shall appear," may we all "receive a crown of glory that fadeth not away."

ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN-METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA, 1873. IN CON-NEXION WITH THE BRITISH CONFERENCE, TO THE CONFERENCE IN ENGLAND, 1873.

REVEREND FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

YOUR paternal Answer to our Address of last year has been duly received; and the reading of it has afforded us grateful satisfaction, and has excited that deep interest which always attaches to your communications.

We rejoice to learn that in the extension of Church accommodations, and in the means of supporting all your home institutions and Missionary operations you have been blessed with unprecedented prosperity, while your ministrations of the Word have never been more faithful, and the attendance upon them has never been so large.

The unity of Methodism to which you give such forcible expression has a profound response in our hearts. Ever since the English and American Conferences, in 1820, mutually declared that the Methodists were one Body throughout the

world, and were determined so to remain, we have cherished the noble and truthful sentiment; and we derive no small satisfaction and encouragement from the conviction and feeling that. with diversities of operations, and even of gifts and administrations in various countries, on whatever continent of the globe or island of the sea, wherever Methodism has opened its commission and proclaimed the Gospel of salvation, the same doctrines have been preached, the same hymns have been sung, the same institutions have been established, the same conversions and reformations have been produced, the same experience has been realised, the same worship is observed, and the same spirit of unity, of onward progress and universal extension is cherished and cultivated; while the leaven of our Scriptural doctrines, and spirit of our Scriptural institutions, have been widely diffused beyond the limits of our own denominational boundaries. Therefore, into whatever arrangements we may enter, or whatever methods we may adopt to advance our providential work in this Dominion, we purpose to keep steadily in view, as you suggest, the fundamental principles and distinguishing land-marks of original Wesleyan-Methodism.

We gratefully record the undisturbed harmony and the uninterrupted success and expansion of our work during the five years of the Presidency of the Rev. William Morley Punshon, LL.D., for whose permission to come to us, and spend a term of years among us, we are indebted to your kindness. During the last five years our Church has been blessed in all its departments with an unusual increase and enlargement; and that success is in no small degree owing, under the Divine blessing, to the administration, counsels, and labours of Dr. Punshon, who, on the expiration of his permitted period of service here, carries with him to the Parent Church and his native land the admiration, respect, gratitude, and affection of the ministers and members of our Church and congregations, and of our country at large, for his truly eloquent and Scriptural discourses and addresses, his practical counsels, and his extensive and unwearied labours. We have sympathized with him in the sorrows through which he has been called to pass, and, on his departure from us, he is accompanied by our best wishes and earnest prayers for his future happiness and usefulness.

We have requested Dr. Punshon to co-operate with our Representatives to your approaching Conference, and to him, in connection with them, we refer you for the details of the progress of our work during the five years of his administration among us, and especially during the past year.

We simply add that during our present Conference we have received thirty-nine young men on trial, and admitted into full connexion and ordained to the work of the ministry thirty-eight young men who have fulfilled their four years of trial, passed all

the required examinations in the most satisfactory manner, and give promise of great efficiency and usefulness.

During the past year many new and commodious places of worship have been crected; we have had an addition to our Church-membership of one thousand and sixty-eight; and a large increase in our Missionary, Educational, Circuit, and other Connexional Funds. Our University, Colleges, and other educational institutions and Sabbath-schools have shared in the general prosperity

Besides the ordinary business of our Conference, the gravest and most vital questions have been largely and carnestly discussed, but without the slightest tinge of bitterness, and in the true spirit of brotherly love. We have considered with great care, and decided upon, the important question of forming all the Methodists in the several provinces of the Dominion of Canada into one Connexion under the control of a Quadrennial General Conference, and several Annual Conferences; and have also considered and adopted certain arrangements and regulations for a union between our own Church and that of the Methodists of the New Connexion.

In order that you may be fully informed of, and give your consent to, these proposed measures, we have appointed as our Representatives to your Body the Rev Edward Hartley Dewart, Editor of the "Christian Guardian," and the Rev. Samuel S. Nelles, D.D., LL.D., President of Victoria University, brethren holding the highest place in our esteem and affection, who will give you all needful information in regard to our contemplated organizations and arrangements, and whom we commend to your affectionate confidence.

From our experience of the great ability of the Rev. Samuel Dwight Rice, D.D., as our President during the proceedings of our present session, we have recommended him as our President of the ensuing year; and we have also nominated as Co-Delegate our respected and long-tried friend and brother the Rev. John A. Williams; and we respectfully request your sanction to these nominations.

Never have the proceedings of our Conference been more harmonious, spiritual, and edifying than during the present session; and, encouraged by the experience of past success and present prosperity, humbled under a consciousness of many shortcomings, impressed by a deep sense of personal obligation, and animated by the promises and prospects of the future, we consecrate ourselves afresh to the Divine work committed to us by the great Head of the Church.

We entreat the co-operation of your prayers for a renewed and copious baptism of the Holy Spirit, that throughout all our congregations, and in all the departments of our Church operations, the Divine blessing in all its fertilizing influences may render our ministrations and labours more successful than ever in our sacred mission of spreading Scriptural holiness over the land.

THE ANSWER OF THE BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1873 TO THE ADDRESS OF THE WESLEYAN-METHODIST CONFERENCE IN CANADA, 1873.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,

It always gives us pleasure to receive from our brethren in the Dominion of Canada such expressions of regard as are contained in the Address presented to us through the hands of your respected Representatives of the present year. The ties of kindred between us are strong, and in the still closer bonds of Christian communion we have learned to sympathize in your trials and joy in your triumphs.

The resolutions we have passed, in response to proposals made by you, with a view to the consolidation of the two Conferences now existing in the Dominion of Canada into one Body, will testify to you with what readiness we have met your wishes. If by the proposed arrangements your strictly official connection with us as the Parent Conference may be said to cease; on the other hand we hope, and indeed believe, as we are warranted to do by the cordial feelings of mutual love wherewith the change in our relations has been proposed on your part and accepted on ours, that your substantial union with us will not be less real nor affectionate; and that, by the influence of the spirit of peace and love, it will be enduring. The responsibility which henceforth not only virtually but also formally devolves upon you, of taking entire charge of the interests of Methodism in your great country, is one for which you have been well prepared by your past course. We doubt not that you will, in the future, be blessed from on high with wisdom and fidelity, so that your present encouraging position will prove to be but a preparation for great and rapid advancement. While the work entrusted to you by the Head of the Church resembles in many respects that committed to ourselves, we are aware that it possesses special characteristics. We are, therefore, ready to believe that He who

sanctions diversities of operations will bestow diversities of gifts; so that while there are differences of administrations there shall be the same Lord working in you and by you, moulding the development of your organization and the history of your Church. You have been able to define a basis of agreement between the allied but divergent bodies of Methodists in your midst; and we trust that your labours will appear to have been undertaken at the dictation of that "spirit of love and of a sound mind" which is promised to Christian communities.

Although the union of different sections of the Church may not assume amongst us the shape it has taken with you, the desire for the promotion of practical agreement between the different Evangelical Churches in our country is increasingly strong. The necessities of our position are compelling us to be united on the essentials of our faith. The principles on which our existence as a Church depends are violently assailed. Men outside the pale of Rome rival her pretensions, and urge the... with unwonted perseverance. Atheism is dogmatically announced and disseminated with all the ardour that has ordinarily accompanied the diffusion of a new religious creed. Against these evils we are contending without abating hope of ultimate victory or faltering in our conviction of the stability of Revealed Truth. Worldliness and the increased luxury of modern life war against onr souls; but against this enemy the Spirit of the Lord still lifts up a standard. During the past year we have not been without gracious visitations of the Holv Ghost in our Churches, and although the places thus blessed have not been as numerous as we desire, we hail all tokens of the Divine presence with reverent gratitude. We believe that a gennine desire for the spreading of Scriptural holiness is strong in the hearts of our people ; and at no time have more carnest and systematic efforts been made to counteract the vices that are of gigantic growth You have shown your appreciation of our efforts amongst us. to prevent poor and neglected children from falling into crime, by opening to them an asylum in your country. We are also endeavouring to utilize for our youth in a higher social position, the advantages of the most perfect culture our Universities We pray that the varied agencies enumerated in your afford. Address to us may be sanctified to the accomplishment of the ends for which they are incorporated in the machinery of the Church ; and that you may rejoice in the fulness of life that redeems Christians from the reproach of those who ask. Where is now their God ? For we are well assured that while spacious edifices for the celebration of Divine service, carefully conducted schools, educated ministers. and numerous adherents, are all causes for gratitude, the best gifts which are to be most earnestly coveted are those of the Spirit, who convinces the world of sin because it believes not in Christ, and who makes the untroubled 1873.

soul of the believer the abode of that peace which "passeth all understanding."

We rejoice to find that the presence of the Rev. W Morley Punshon, LL.D., amongst you has been accompanied with the great and varied benefits you have recognised in your Address as conferred upon your Church by his residence in Canada. And we now receive him afresh into the ranks of our ministry with an affection and regard that temporary absence has only intensified.

We cheerfully sanction your nomination of the Rev. Samuel Dwight Rice, D.D., as President for the ensuing year, and of the Rev. John A. Williams as Co-Delegate.

Again assuring you of our Christian and fraternal sympathy, we bid you farewell, praying that our God would count you worthy of His calling, and fulfil all the good pleasure of His goodness, and the work of faith with power, that the Name of our Lord Jesus Christ may be glorified in you, and ye in Him.

ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE AUSTRALASIAN WESLEYAN-METHODIST CHURCH, 1873, TO THE BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1873.

HONOURED FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

This annual opportunity of hearing from you, and of communicating with you, is to us more than a form, it is a privilegc. It is an outward and visible sign of an inward and spiritual grace of sympathy and oneness, which we desire to preserve and strengthen. It can never be forgotten by us, that for many years our colonial as well as our Polynesian Churches were Missionary organizations, whose ministers were sent forth from your ranks, and supported at the cost of your Missionary Society. And however firmly we may become attached to the land, and the people amongst whom we live, and however confidently we may expect for our Church a great future here, we to listen to the voice, of English Methodism.

Eighteen years ago, we entered on the second period of our Methodist history in these lands, namely, that of organization under our Australasian Conference. The same reasons which indicated the necessity of that change, seem now with equal force to justify further change in the same direction.

The desire for local representation and government amounts to a passion in these parts of the British Empire : nor can we doubt that the Church as well as the State is most susceptible of sound and rapid development when this desire finds fitting mechanism for its exercise. And therefore the creation of Colonial Conferences, obeying the attraction, and revolving around the central light of a periodical General Conference. has been one of the ruling ideas of our present Assembly. The adjustments necessary are neither few nor easily compassed : and we thank you for your kindness in directing our attention to some of them. These have now been carefully considered by us. and we have anxiously, and, as we trust, not in vain, sought the guidance of the God of our fathers, who has so signally impressed a providential order on all the history of Methodism, both earlier and later. It has afforded us much satisfaction to see amongst us, as a Deputation from your Missionary Committee to ours, the Rev. W B. Boyce, whose name is indelibly written on the records of Australasian Methodism. Both our Missionary Committee and our Conference received him with the most hearty demonstrations of welcome : and the question of the future management of our Polynesian Missions was not only most earefully considered, but our conclusions were unanimous, and in perfect agreement with the judgment of our esteemed visitor; whom we found as willing as ever to afford us the benefit of that sagacity in counsel, and that large experience of Missions and of Methodism, which many of us remember in connection with his name and work in former days.

Our Minutes this year convey to you the obituary of one of our foremost men, the late Rev. Stephen Rabone. As one of the first and most successful missionaries in the Friendly Islands, as an earnest and able minister in many of the principal Circuits in this Colony, as our Missionary Secretary in a most critical period of our Missions, and as the administrator of a very large part of our Colonial Church Funds, Mr. Rabone moved amongst us with such serene diligence, and such many-sided efficiency, that we had scarcely realised the amount of work he was doing for us, until his sudden removal by death.

The Rev. Benjamin Chapman, our Ex-President, and for hany years the Secretary of our Conference, has been appointed by us Mr. Rabone's successor. This election will give general satisfaction to the friends of our Missions in these colonies, and we are confident will meet with your approval also.

The completion of the electric telegraph this year, between ourselves at the remotest outposts of civilization and your shores, is an event in which we discern the presage of more direct and immediate sympathy between ourselves and you in the

future than in the past. The impulses which are ever moving the societies of your merchants and capitalists, of your philosophers and your statesmen, are not the only ones which will be transmitted through the electric wire over half the world, to spend themselves in Australasia. The follies and crimes of the older world are rehearsed to us daily, and the political vibrations of the great empires of the earth do not subside now-adays until they have penetrated and disturbed the obscurest island-kingdoms of this ocean. But we expect to share more fully in the blessings of good rapidly diffused, than in the curse of moral evil, winged with evil, and outstripping the tempest or the pestilence. We hope to read the swiftly-borne messages of great spiritual baptisms gladdening the Churches of British Methodism, and then, even while you are telling us that the Covenant Angel is pouring on you the fulness of His saving grace. to be able to reply that we also hear His footsteps, and feel His glorious presence in our assemblies.

We are now entering upon a third period of Australasian Methodism. And as we pass on in the appointed path of progress, we see reasons for much gratitude to God, chastened, however, and guarded from boasting by some facts which call for humiliation and self-searching. We find, on making up the numbers of our Church-members for the year, that we have to record a small increase in our Mission Churches, but an almost equal decrease in our Colonial Churches. We have learnt to distinguish between the ecclesiastical process, which adds another adherent, and the spiritual power which regenerates a soul, and adds another genuine Christian to the brotherhood of Christ's disciples. The increase of converted Church-members is to us, as to you, the thing most to be desired, the surest sign of progress, and the richest fruit of the Divine presence. And yet, with this ground of humiliation before God, the increase of our Church during the last eighteen years has been very great, and the reasons for gratitude, and the encouragements to renewed effort, are very conspicuous. We have more Church-members now in any one of five of our principal Colonial Districts than we had in our whole Connexion, exclusive of the Polynesian Missions, when our first Conference assembled under the Presidency of the Rev. William B. Boyce. This growth appears in every department of our Colonial work; while in our Missionary Churches, the spirit of Christian liberality has attained surprising fervour, and has expressed itself in extraordinary munificence. Our supply of ministers raised up from amongst ourselves is nearly equal to our requirements, though we expect still occasionally to ask your help, especially to meet extraordinary_openings for evangelical effort. But we pray that the great "Lord of the harvest" may raise up, both to us and you, many labourers eminently endowed with strength, and with

wisdom to grasp the ever-growing work of the ever-widening field of Christian enterprise.

We very cordially thank you for sanctioning our choice of a President, and appointing the Rev. Thomas Williams to that office. Ile has proved himself well qualified for the duties of an unusually important and memorable Conference; and has thus inaterially added to those claims upon our esteem, which he has won as a good Minister of the Lord Jesus, proved not only amidst the perils of Fijian barbarism, but also amidst the responsibilities and labours of some of the most important Circuits of our Colonial work.

THE ANSWER OF THE BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1873 TO THE ADDRESS OF THE AUSTRALASIAN CONFERENCE, 1873.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,

"GRACE be unto you, and peace, from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ." As fellow-heirs of the Kingdom of God, and co-workers with us in the world-wide field of Evangelical toil, we heartily reciprocate your sentiments of brotherly affection; and assure you that the bonds that unite us were never more dearly cherished by us than now : your successes, your joys, and your sorrows are ours Especially we rejoice in the signal and rapid expansion of your work, which has so soon imposed upon you the necessity of developing your organization, and adapting it to the requirements of the vast continent of Australia and its dependent Missionary Stations. It is unnecessary to remind you that such changes as you have resolved upon, although more easily effected under the favourable conditions of colonial society, and demanded by the exigencies of the case, need to be carried out with great unanimity and deliberation. They should rather be the spontaneous outgrowth of circumstances than the anticipation of future and contingent requirements. But in this important matter we believe, and pray, that the same guiding hand of Providence which has so conspicuously conducted us and our fathers until now, will equally direct you, that the issue may be for the glory of God and the furtherance of the Gospel.

The cheering statements contained in your Address, and the

strong testimony borne by your honoured Representative, the Rev. W B. Boyce, respecting the efficiency and faithfulness of your ministrations, have given us unfeigned pleasure. We glorify God in you, and desire earnestly for you a more abundant measure of the spirit of wisdom, power, and love.

With you we lament the loss of so eminent a Minister of Jesus Christ, and so wise an administrator, as your late faithful and devoted Missionary Secretary, the Rev. Stephen Rabone; and cannot forget that we also have to sorrow over the graves of the venerable Thomas Jackson and the Rev. William Shaw, men whose memory is precious, and whose praise is in all the Churches. Yet our sorrow is chastened by hope while we follow their faith, and consider the end of their conversation: nor would we ever forget that "Jesus Christ" is "the same yesterday, and to-day, and for ever."

In the choice of the Rev. Benjamin Chapman, as Mr. Rabone's successor in office, we cordially coincide. We know his approved ability and diligent attention to the duties confided to his charge; and therefore entertain the hope that under his prudent direction your Missionary operations will not only be maintained in their full vigour, but largely extended, and crowned with more abundant success.

We commend to your special care and sympathy the Missions in Fiji. The reports which have reached us of the wrongs inflicted upon some of the native Islanders under the pretext of hired labour, but really reviving some of the worst features of Negro slavery, have excited a very general feeling of indignation and sorrow in the hearts of Christian and philanthropic men. That such atrocities should have been perpetrated under the protection of the English flag is intolcrable. More than once the subject has been brought under the notice of the British Government, and we trust that effective measures will soon be adopted to put an end to such nefarious practices, and bring the offenders to justice.

The establishment of telegraphic communication with you, as with other distant parts of the globe, cannot fail to have an influence upon the well-being of the universal Church, equally powerful with that which it has upon the material interests of mankind; and we discern in it the hand of Divine Providence binding together God's scattered people, providing them with the means of closer intercourse, and preparing them for united aggression upon the confederate powers of evil.

The fact that our numerical increase, both at home and abroad, is not in due proportion to the enlargement and augmented vigour of our operations, supplies ground for prayer and thoughtful inquiry. Without doubt, "because iniquity abounds the love of many waxes cold." The intense worldliness of the age encourages the growth of moral evil, and eats out the religious life of many who were once "alive to God" and "zealous of good works." Hence the disposition to separate themselves and seek shelter in a painted ritual, or a vain and rationalistic philosophy, in the ornate services of Rome, or the self-complacent conceits of scepticism. Against these forms of error, which everywhere present themselves, and seem daily to be acquiring new strength, we have abundant reason to utter a united, faithful, and practical testimony. Therefore we exhort you, brethren, to encourage by all possible means, especially by the maintenance of class-meetings, the actual communion of saints, which both Holy Scripture and experience have shown to be so essential to the support and increase of spiritual life.

Finally, we entreat you to unite with us in earnest, believing, and importunate prayer for the baptism of the Spirit upon our Churches, and the "power of convincing speech in our ministrations." This is our only sufficient and certain resource amid the perils of the present time; and the promise is sure, "I will pour out My Spirit upon all flesh." Let the ery go up to heaven from every faithful heart, alike from the sanctuary and the closet, "Awake, awake, put on strength, O arm of the Lord: awake, as in the ancient days, in the generations of old;" "O that Thou wouldest rend the heavens, that Thou wouldest come down, that the mountains might flow down at Thy presence;" "Save now, I beseech Thee, O Lord : O Lord, I beseech Thee, send now prosperity !" "Now the God of Peace, that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenant, make you perfect in every good work to do His will, working in you that which is well pleasing in His sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory for ever and ever. Amen."

ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN-METHODIST CHURCH OF EASTERN BRITISH AME-RICA, 1873, TO THE BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1873.

REVEREND AND VERY DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

To greet you with our filial and fraternal salutations is not a matter of mere routine. Those of us who were born across the Atlantie, and came to this country to prosecute missionary labours, have lost none of our love and loyalty to the old land and the mother Church; those of us who are natives of this land rejoice that we live under British laws and institutions, and trace with gratitude and joy the history, both at home and abroad, of the Church founded by the Wesleys, and early planted in the Western World.

The Address from your venerable Body is always listened to with most respectful attention. The Address read to us during our present session afforded us much delight. We do indeed rejoice with you in the stability and extension of your work among the dense populations of your own land, and in the magnitude and success of your Missionary operations on many shores. The decrease in your membership at home which you were compelled to report a year ago, was an occasion of sorrow to us also. We hope, however, that at your approaching Conference you will be able to record a large accession. We are encouraged in this hope by the tidings of revivals, in many parts of your work, over which we have rejoiced, during the months which have elapsed since your Address was written. The position of Methodism in the old country is a matter of deepest interest to us, and we shall rejoice, as Methodists and Britons, over your continued progress.

We sympathize with you in the loss your Connexion has sustained by the dcath of such eminent and devoted men as Dixon, Hoole, and Vasey, as mentioned in your Address; and of others, especially the venerable Thomas Jackson, of whose departure we have otherwise heard. But we rejoice that God ever raises up for your ministry worthy successors of the illustrious and sainted dead.

A review of our year's work and its apparent results is, on the whole, encouraging. Several young men have come to us since last Conference from various English Circuits, but the supply of ministerial labour is not yet equal to the growth and demands of our work. Two young men, sons of two of our own aged ministers, having honourably finished their probation, have been now ordained to the office and work of the ministry. Seventeen young men have been received at this Conference as candidates for our work, so that we have now upon probation sixty-four young men,-a greater number than for several years past. Six brethren who were compelled to retire from active work last year, have been so benefited by the rest thus secured, as to be able to return this year to the active work. On the other hand, however, five of our brethren become Supernumcrarics, of whom all but two have long laboured in the Master's service, and probably retire permanently from full Circuit work.

It is our mournful duty to report the deaths of three members of our Body. One, the Rev. William Temple, after a long life of devoted and useful toil in the service of God and His Church, has gone to his rest; another after nine years of labour in Newfoundland, where pleasing memories of him will linger long; and a third who had just gone out from the Sackville Institutions, as we hoped, for many years of honourable warfare. But His will is best who ruleth over all, and knowing that "blessed are the dead whielf die in the Lord," we "comfort one another with these words."

The increase of our membership, though not equal to our desires, is still sufficient to make us thankful to God, and encourage us in our work. Blessed revivals have been given, in answer to prayer, in many of our Circuits, especially in Newfoundland; and we find ourselves able to report a net increase of five hundred and sixty-seven members, and two thousand two hundred and thirty-one on trial.

Our Funds generally show a corresponding advancement, especially our Home Mission Fund, which three years ago had an income of only three thousand dollars, but this year is in receipt of ten thousand seven hundred and three dollars. We shall have for many years to eome abundant demands on this Fund; and realising that the extension of our work depends largely upon it, we are making earnest efforts to raise it to a state of adequate efficiency. While we are trying to do our duty towards our own land, and are eager to extend our home work, much of which, especially in Newfoundland, is truly missionary in character, we do not forget the claims of the world upon us; and the cry, "Gome over, and help us," reaching us from distant shores, evokes the sympathies of our people and ourselves.

Our Educational Institutions continue to prosper. Though the withdrawal of Government aid has been an occasion of temporary difficulty, it will, we believe, ultimately result in great and permanent good to this department of our work. The Endowment Fund, now a matter of necessity, has reached the sum of forty-five thousand dollars; we aim at raising it to the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, and have set apart as agent of this Fund, the Rev. H. Pickard, D.D., whose long connection with our Educational enterprise, and business tact and energy, well qualify him for this work. In our young country, with its growing population, its increasing wealth and culture, and the bright future, we feel called to do our best in the great work of liberal and Christian education.

The affairs of our Book-Room, under prudent management, continue to improve; and this establishment, which we once feared it would be impossible to maintain, now promises to be, at least, a self-supporting institution, and, we trust, an instrument of great good.

A plan for the union of our Conference with the Canada Conference, under one general administration, having already been accepted by the latter body, has been approved of by us with unanimity. From the consummation of this great object, for the inception of which we are largely indebted to the wisdom and faithful labours of your own Dr. Punshon, we hope for great and blessed results. We regret, however, that notwithstanding the contemplated change in our relations, the essentially missionary character of our work in these maritime provinces will render it necessary for us to look for financial help to your venerable Body for some years to come.

We have appointed as a Deputation to represent us in your approaching Conference, and to negotiate with you in all matters likely to be affected by the contemplated union of our Conference with the Canada Conference, our esteemed brethren, the Rev. Dr. Stewart, President of the Conference, and Dr. Pickard, our Financial Agent.

We request you will appoint as our next President the Rev. John M'Murray, and as Co-Delegate the Rev. George S. Milligan, A.M.

The interest of our session, which has been one of great harmony, has been increased by the presence of Dr. Rice, the esteemed President of the Canada Conference. In all our meetings, Conferential and public, the presence of our gracious Master has been felt, and from this happy re-union we go forth, expecting in our Circuits "times of refreshing from the presence of the Lord;" and now, and ever, for all His care and mercies, and for all our success, we will say, "Blessed be the Lord God, the God of Israel, who only doeth wondrous things; and blessed be His glorious name for ever: and let the whole earth be filled with His glory; Amen, and Amen."

THE ANSWER OF THE BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1873 TO THE ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN-METHODIST CHURCH IN EASTERN-BRITISH AMERICA, 1873.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,

In the name of our common Lord and Master we convey to you the expression of our brotherly esteem and love. It was highly gratifying to us to find, both from the language of your Address, and the oral testimonies of Dr. Stewart and for good in the prosecution of those hallowed labours to which you have devoted your lives. In this you will readily discern proof of the Divine faithfulness. Ever mindful of His word, the great Head of the Church sustains His servants in their ardnons toil by supplies of His Holy Spirit.

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We joy with you in reviewing the tokens of prosperity with which the Holy Spirit has gladdened your Societies and Missions during the year; especially that most grateful sign of the Divine favour, the accession of many new-born souls to the Church. We carnestly pray that in the anxious work of preserving the sheep you have gathered, you may be able so to watch over them that not one may escape from the fold. If these new converts hold fast their confidence, you will, in future days, gather from their ranks a supply of faithful labourers whose charge it shall be to earry on the work now entrusted to your own hands. Be assured also that we account any oceasion for praise to our Redeemer which may be given you, an opportunity granted to ourselves of joining with you in the Apostolic Doxology, "Now, thanks be unto God who always causeth us to triumph in Christ, and maketh manifest the sayour of Ilis knowledge by us in every place."

At this our annual Assembly, we have not, as last year, to report a decrease in our numbers. The returns from the Distriets show a net increase on the preceding year of one thousand seven hundred and thirty. We have now three hundred and forty-eight thousand five hundred and eighty members ; with twenty thousand eight hundred and forty-four who have been admitted on trial. We accept this token of the Divine favour as a challenge from our Heavenly Lord to renew our zeal and devotion, and a powerful incitement always to stand in readiness,

> "To help the souls redeem'd by Him, In what their various states demand; To teach, convince, correct, reprove, And build them up in holiest love."

The Minutes of our Conference will inform you of the removal by death of honoured fathers and brethren, each of whom in his own sphere was a faithful steward of the manifold gifts of God. The names of men of renown are found among them. The venerable Thomas Jaekson has entered into rest. His saintly character, and Christian gentleness, maintained through an unusually lengthened period, endeared him not only to curselves, but also to thousands of our people. You have known and valued, equally with us, his public ministry, and the eminent services he rendered to Methodism in every department of its work. William Shaw, a man of God, justly entitled to the appellation of "The Apostle of Southern Africa," and of whom the Churches in that country have abundant reason to retain an affectionate remembrance, has closed his career of usefulness in peace. Two veterans in the field of Irish Methodism, Thomas Waugh and Daniel Macafee, have also departed this life. These eminent men were well known and highly esteemed amongst ourselves, and by not a few in the provinces of British America.

We regard your deep concern for the extension of Christian education, and your zealous efforts to promote it, with great joy; and most earnestly pray that your highest expectations concerning it may be fully realised. It has, moreover, given us much pleasure to hear of the liberal sustentation of your Funds, especially that connected with your Home Missionary operations.

We doubt not, dear brethren, that the conviction of your minds, touching the pressing spiritual necessities of your home population, and the adaptation of Methodism to meet those necessities, is as powerful as amongst us. Perishing souls demand our sympathy and help, and, by God's grace, the demand shall not be made in vain.

An influential Committee of this Conference has given to your proposal for union with the Canadian Conference its most careful consideration. We have full confidence that this most important measure will issue in the much wider extension of the work of God among you; inasmuch as it will enable you to meet the forces of evil arrayed against the truth as it is in Jesus with an united army of faithful men. The fulfilment of your hopes concerning it may be looked upon as certain, for "the battle is the Lord's."

We have agreed to certain Resolutions relating to the proposed Union which, we trust, will enable you and the Canada Conference to adopt such measures as, by the Divine blessing, may conduce to the growth, consolidation, and increase of Methodism in the extensive regions within which the proposed Union will carry forward its operations.

To the addresses of the beloved brethren who have represented you we have listened with much interest; and we most willingly accede to your request that the Rev. John M'Murray should be appointed the President of your next Assembly; and that the Rev. George S. Milligan, M.A., should act as Co-Delegate. You will rejoice to hear that in the several sessions of our present Conference, and in the public services connected with it, we have been favoured with manifest tokens of the Divine presence. Our people have been edified. We ourselves have been strengthened, and shall return to our several Circuits with purposes of renewed consecration to the duties of our sacred calling. As sharers in the blessings of "the common salvation," and as one with you in all that concerns the prosperity of the kingdom of our great God and Saviour Jesus Christ, we bear you in our hearts to the throne of grace. In the earnestness of prayer, and in the strength of faith,—that faith of which our own Richard Watson has said, "It is a bold, a daring, and an imperious thing, and will not be denied,"—we implore for you, and for your flocks, abundant baptisms of the Holy Ghost : that both in your private means of grace, and your public assemblies, you may have daily reason to utter the inspired challenge, "Cry out and shout, O inhabitants of Zion, for great is the Holy One of Israel in the midst of thee !"

MEMORIAL PRESENTED TO THE CONFERENCE BY A DEPUTATION OF MINISTERS BELONGING TO VARIOUS EVANGELICAL NONCONFORMIST DENOMINATIONS IN NEWCASTLE AND ITS NEIGHBOURHOOD.

THE CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN-METHODIST CONNEXION Assembled in newcastle, 1873.

DEAR BRETHREN,

WE, the Evangelical Nonconformist Ministers of various denominations in Newcastle, take the opportunity of your assembling in this town to offer you the assurance of our hearty Christian affection, of our devout congratulation on all the success with which God has honoured you in your work for Him in the past, and of our carnest prayers that He may vouchsafe to you yet greater prosperity in days to come.

Differing as we do from one another on several points of doctrine and polity, which, however important we may deem them, none of us regard as essential to salvation, or to Christian character, we are one in the maintenance of the fundamental verities of the Gospel of Christ. And we believe that in the times which are coming upon us it will more and more behove those who are thus one to take every fitting occasion to recognise and proclaim their unity; and it will be more and more important that, while frankly maintaining all our distinctive views, we should stand shoulder to shoulder in the gathering conflicts of our time, hailing one another as brethren alike set for the defence of the freedom and purity of the Gospel, against all sacerdotal corruptions on the one hand, and all so-called rationalistic negations on the other. The very differences which to some extent divide us add force to these considerations. The differences are patent to the world, and made much of by the world in its enmity to the truth. The unity which lies bencath the differences is less obvious, and the opportunities for manifesting it are comparatively rare. Those opportunities should be therefore the more highly prized and the more anxiously turned to account. It is with these views and objects that we have asked permission to present to you these few words of fraternal greeting to-day.

We recognise with gratitude the testimony you have been and are enabled to bear for the liberty of preaching, and for the Missionary responsibilities of the Church of Christ. We rejoice with unfeigned joy in the glorious results which have attended your work, especially in the more neglected districts of our land. We believe that your example has done much, and will yet do more, to inspire other Christian bodies to generous rivalry with you in this evangelistic campaign, and to suggest wiser methods of carrying it on. We observe with thankfulness that your statistics present encouraging tokens of prosperity and progress ; and we join you in beseeching the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ that He would pour out upon His Church a larger spirit of faith and zeal, of consecration and prayer, so that the coming of His Kingdom may be hastened, and His way be known upon earth, His saving health among all nations.

MEETING OF THE MISSIONARY COMMITTEE OF REVIEW,

HELD IN NEWCASTLE-UPON-TYNE, JULY 29TH, 1873.

THE REV. LUKE H. WISEMAN, M.A., President of the Conference, in the Chair.

Moved by the Rev. Dr. Jobson; seconded by Mr. John Napier; supported by Mr. T. P Bunting:

1. That this Committee cannot listen to the record of the death of two such eminent men and able Ministers as the Rev. William Shaw and the Rev. Thomas Jackson without expressing its sense of the heavy loss which the Society has sustained by the decease of their beloved and honoured friends. In their removal, as well as in that of several faithful and generous lay members of the General Committee, this Committee is reminded that "the night cometh, when no man can work."

Moved by the Rev. Dr. James; seconded by Signor Sciarelli

and the Rev. T. W. S. Jones; supported by Mr. N. Subrahmanyam Ayar, B.A., LL.D., and the Rev. Joseph Bush:

2. That this Committee has heard with much satisfaction that the debt of the Society is liquidated, that there is a steady advance in the ordinary income from the Home and Foreign Auxiliaries, and that many departed friends have enriched the Society by large bequests; but as the Society depends mainly for its support upon the regular income from subscriptions, donations, and public collections, this Committee would again repeat its conviction that this income might be largely augmented by the more systematic and earnest working of the details of the Auxiliary and Branch organizations.

Moved by the Rev. William G. Price; seconded by the Rev George Piercy; supported by Mr. Stephenson and the Rev. John Edwards:

3. That this Committee approves of the application of the principles acted upon in the administration of the Home Mission and Contingent Fund to the case of all Circuits in South Africa and the West Indies, and all other Colonial Circuits needing assistance from the Mission Fund, and rejoices to learn that some of the Native Churches are steadily advancing towards self-support, not only in providing pecuniary means but in furnishing candidates for a Native Ministry; and that in the judgment of this Committee the principle of self-support cannot be too early or earnestly enforced on all Native Churches, in order that they may not be enfeebled by undue reliance on foreign assistance.

Moved by the Rev. John Bedford; seconded by Mr. Mewburn:

4. That this Committee recommends that the thanks of the Conference be presented to Mr. James Heald, and the Rev. Dr. Jobson, the General Treasurers, to the General Secretaries, and to the Committee of Management, for their services during the past year.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE NEW KINGSWOOD AND WOODHOUSE GROVE SCHOOLS AND EDUCATION FUND,

HELD IN NEWCASTLE-UPON-TYNE, JULY 25TH, 1873.

PRESENT, the REV. LUKE H. WISEMAN, M.A., President of the Conference, in the Chair; the Rev. G. T. Perks, M.A., Secretary of the Conference; the Rev. Benjamin B. Waddy, Treasurer of the Fund; the Rev. Frederick Payne and the Rev. John Harvard, Sceretaries of the Fund; the Rev. G. Stringer Rowe, Secretary of the Children's Fund, and others.

It was reported that the number of Ministers' children upon the Fund in the past year has been 677; 246 boys in the Schools, 116 girls in the Schools, and 315 boys and girls receiving education allowances at home. The cost has been £17,825 7s. 8d.; and the deficiency provided for by the Children's Fund is $\pm 4,347$ 3s. 3d.

The examinations have been conducted for the most part, both at New Kingswood and Woodhouse Grove, by gentlemen appointed by the Syndicate of the University of Cambridge, at the request of the Local Committees. This has resulted from the inability of the Rev. W. F. Moulton, M.A., to continue the very efficient services rendered by him for several years past. But the value of those services has been most conclusively proved by the confirmation of his former reports, in their most important features, by the independent examiners of the present year.

The health of the Schools has been on the whole good, and the moral tone has been high. The religious culture of the children has been steadily kept in view, and many of them have given their hearts to God.

It was unanimously resolved, That this Committee, understanding that the Committees appointed by the Conference in 1871, and again in 1872, have duly reported, and convinced of the importance and necessity of prompt action on the subjects which they have considered, expresses its carnest hope that such action may be taken accordingly by the Conference at its ensuing session.

It was also unanimously resolved to recommend that the thanks of the Conference be given :---

1. To the Rev. Benjamin B. Waddy and Mr. John Meek, the General Treasurers; the Rev. Frederick Payne and the Rev. John Harvard, the General Secretaries; and to the Local Treasurers, Secretaries, and Committees, for the diligent and efficient discharge of the duties of their respective offices during the past year.

2. To the Rev. William II. Sargent and the Rev. Henry H. Chettle, the Governors of the Schools, and to Mrs. Sargent and Mrs. Chettle, together with the ladies having charge of the Schools for girls, at Clapton and Southport, for their kind attention to the comfort of the children under their care during the past year; and to Mr. Thomas Osborn, the Head Master of New Kingswood School, and Mrs. Osborn, who have kindly supplied the place of Mr. and Mrs. Sargent.

3. To the ladies and gentlemen who, at the request of the Local Committees, have kindly served the Institutions by

examining the Schools for both boys and girls in various branches of learning.

MEETING OF THE COMMITTEE OF REVIEW ON CHAPEL AFFAIRS,

HELD IN NEWCASTLE-UPON-TYNE, JULY 28TH, 1873.

PRESENT, the REV. L. H. WISEMAN, M.A., President of the Conference; the Rev. G. T. Perks, M.A., Secretary of the Conference; the Revs. W Edwards and E. H. Tindall, Secretaries of the Chapel Committee; the Revs. John Farrar, Dr. Stamp, J. Bedford, W. Arthur, M.A., Dr. James, and other Ministers.

Also, Messrs. T. P. Bunting, Alderman Brown, W Holland, Sir F. Lycett, J. Napier, John Berrie, W W Pocock, T. C. Squance, and many others.

The Rev. W Edwards read the Report for the year 1872-3, of which the following is an abstract :---

The Income from all Sources is $\pm 8,51310s.1d.$, being an increase from ordinary sources of $\pm 20410s.7d.$

The Subscriptions and Collections for the "North Wales Fund" amount to $\pounds 590$ 5s. 10d., being an increase on the year of $\pounds 27$ 19s. 4d.

I. BUILDING DEPARTMENT.

Erections sanctioned.

135 Chapels, at an estimated cost of £218,462; 14 Ministers' houses, £10,155; 26 School Rooms, £18,366; 88 Enlargements and Alterations, £46,426; 74 Modifications, £24,364; 28 Organs, £6,042. There are 21 fewer cases than in the year preceding, but the outlay proposed is £323,815, being £17,088 above that of the previous year; and the temporary debt sanctioned is £52,346, being $17\frac{1}{7}$ per cent. The aid promised by the Committee to new Chapels is, in Grants, £4,700; in Loans, £11,410.

Sales.

The Committee have sanctioned the sale of 28 Chapels, 4 Ministers' houses, 2 Schools, 2 cottages, and 2 plots of land. 26 Chapels are to be superseded by more commodious erections.

Erections completed.

In the following cases the conditions agreed upon with the Committee have been observed :—85 Chapels, costing £126,901; 15 Ministers' houses, £11,539; 20 School Rooms, £18,988; 42 Enlargements, etc., £23,317; 30 Organs, £8,433. In 56 cases the conditions have not been observed : the per-centage of debt on these is $39\frac{1}{6}$.

There are also 23 cases for which Connexional sanction was not sought, and on which the per-centage of debt is 50³. The entire outlay, $\pm 254,160$. During the year the Committee have paid towards new Chapels,—Grants, $\pm 3,155$; Loans, $\pm 2,765$.

II. RELIEF DEPARTMENT.

Grants.

To the Trustees of 61 Chapels $\pm 2,500$ have been paid. On 26 \pm these no debt now remains.

Loans.

The Loan instalments received during the year, have amounted to $\pm 8,139$ Gs. on the *Relief* account, and $\pm 2,298$ on the *Erections'-Fund* account. The Loans now in operation are 562. $\pm 6,639$ have been advanced to meet $\pm 8,041$ raised by Trustees. The South Wales Loan Committee have advanced ± 88 to meet ± 90 raised by Trustees; and the North Wales Committee have relyanced ± 475 to meet ± 600 .

III. LOCAL EFFORTS.

The sums paid off by local efforts and surplus income are $\pm 24,734$ 8s. 3d., being $\pm 2,603$ 13s. 5d. less than last year.

Contributions to Circuit Funds.

2,470 Trusts have contributed £28,091 13s. 8d., being an increase of 100 Trusts, and £2,365 11s. 4d. in contributions.

IV BUMMARY.

The total amount of debts discharged is $\pm 54,483$, making $\pm 946,886$ in the last 19 years.

The total sum contributed in Great Britain, in the last year, as far as ascertained, is $\pounds 244, 226$, an increase of $\pounds 16,330$ upon last year, being by that amount the largest ever reported.

V. GENERAL MANAGEMENT OF TRUST ESTATES.

The returns include particulars relating to 6,312 Trust Estates. There is an increase of 1,224 in the number insured against fire. This increase is chiefly owing to the energetic manner in which the Wesleyan-Methodist Trust Insurance Company have commenced and carried on their business during the year. The following Resolutions were adopted :----

Moved by the Rev. Dr. Jobson, and seconded by Mr. Elkanah Healey:

1. That this Meeting regards with satisfaction the large amount of success which has attended the work of this Department, during the past year, as detailed in the Report now read. It is also gratified to find that a growing anxiety is felt for the removal of the burdens still heavily oppressing many of our Chapel Trusts, but regrets that, owing to the inadequacy of the Funds at their disposal, the Chapel Committee have been compelled, even for a time, to restrict the beneficial operations of this branch of the Fund. Under these circumstances, this Meeting renews its suggestion of last year, that Trustees applying for aid from the Relief Loan Fund should raise a larger proportion of debt than is required by rule, and repay the Loans advanced within a shorter term than ten years, and thus co-operate with the Chapel Committee in diffusing the advantages of the Fund over as wide an area as possible.

Moved by the Rev. Charles Prest; seconded by Sir Francis Lycett; and supported by Mr. W Mewburn:

2. That this Meeting is gratified to find that new Chapel Erections and Enlargements, estimated to provide a considerable number of additional sittings, have been sanctioned during the year, and that, in this way, vigorous efforts are being made in many places to extend as well as to consolidate Wesleyan-Methodism. But it would rejoice, still more, in such an augmentation of the funds at the disposal of the Chapel Committee as would enable them to secure that, in all future new Chapel Erections, no liability remain upon any Trust except a Loan by a Connexional Committee.

Moved by the Rev. W B. Pope; seconded by Mr. T. P. Bunting; and supported by the Rev. E. E. Jenkins:

3. That this Meeting deeply regrets the loss sustained in the death of Mr. John Fernley, the senior Treasurer of the Chapel Fund, and desires to express its devout thankfulness to Almighty God for the fidelity and ability with which he was enabled, for many years, to serve the Church of Christ. By generously devoting his gifts of time, talent, and influence to originating and perfecting the plans and principles upon which the Regulations of the Chapel Committee are founded, the late Mr. Fernley rendered invaluable service to the cause of Methodism, whilst his munificent bequest to one branch of the Chapel Fund will remain as one among the many proofs with which his life abounded, of the deep and intelligent interest which he felt in the progress and efficiency of this Department of our affairs. Moved by the Rev. W Jackson (Λ) ; seconded by Mr. W. Holland; and supported by Mr. Moore:

4. That the thanks of this Meeting be presented to the District Chapel Secretaries and Committees, to the Circuit Chapel Secretaries, and to the Ministers and Trustees who have acted with them, for their valuable services to this Department of Methodism.

Moved by the Rev. J. Clapham ; seconded by Mr. T. Bucktrout ; and supported by the Rev. Dr. Scott :

5. That the thanks of this Meeting be presented to Messrs. Healey and Napier, the Treasurers; to the Rev. Messrs. Edwards and Tindall, the General Secretaries; to the Rev. John Bedford, Secretary of the Board of Trustees for Chapel Purposes; and to the Committee, for their diligent and faithful services.

METROPOLITAN WESLEYAN CHAPEL BUILDING FUND.

THE Secretary read the following Statement :----

During the past year eleven eligible sites have been secured, towards the cost of which the Committee has voted $\pm 5,800$. Four new erections have been sanctioned. These have received the following promises of help, viz. :

The ordinary income has increased during the year, £938-198. 6d.

Twenty-nine Public Meetings have been held, and one hundred and thirteen Sermons preached in the various Metropolitan Chapels on behalf of the Fund. The Committee has listened to an appeal on behalf of the Westminster Chapel, and has agreed not to press for the repayment of its loan of $\pounds 1,100$ made some years ago towards the purchase of the site. This has been agreed to in the hope and expectation that the whole scheme of liquidation will be successful.

The Provincial Fund has reached nearly £64,500.

The Fund has sustained heavy losses during the year in the removal, by death, of several of its supporters, both Ministers and Laymen.

Since the Fund was established in 1861, thirty-two new Chapels have been erected, and two have been enlarged. Four School-Chapels and four iron temporary Chapels have been built. Additional accommodation has thus been provided for thirty-five thousand people, at a cost of about £170,000. Three Chapels and two School Rooms are now in course of erection; and sixteen sites are ready for occupation.

The following Resolutions were adopted :----

Moved by the Rev. William W Stamp, D.D.; seconded by Mr. T. P. Bunting:

1. That this Meeting has heard, with gratitude to God, of the progress of the Metropolitan Wesleyan Chapel Building Fund during the year, both in the number of Chapels which have been opened, and in the increase of Annual Subscriptions and Collections. The Meeting hears also with thankfulness of the amount of Donations which has been promised in the Provinces.

Moved by the Rev. Joseph Hargreaves ; seconded by Mr. John Berrie :

2. That considering the moral and spiritual needs of the Metropolis, this Meeting endorses the request of the Committee, and recommends the Conference to renew the expression of its sympathy with this movement, and to urge upon the London Ministers and friends enlarged efforts in reference to increased Subscriptions in the Circuits, and Annual Sermons and Meetings in the various Chapels.

3. That this Meeting recommends that the thanks of the Conference be given to Sir Francis Lycett and Mr. William M'Arthur, M.P., the Treasurers; to the Rev. The Report of the Committee of Management, and that of the Army and Navy Committee, having been read, and the recommendations of the Committee respecting Grants for Extraordinary Claims having been revised and approved, the following Resolutions were unanimously adopted :—

Moved by the Rev. C. Prest; seconded by the Rev. Dr. Jobson: and supported by Mr. Thomas Dyson, of Thurgoland :

1. That in recommending to the Conference the adoption of the Report, this Committee records its grateful acknowledgments to Almighty God for His continued blessing on our Home-Mission work, and on our ministrations to declared Wesleyans in the Army and Royal Navy; and considering the urgent necessities of the rural parts of the country for additional Ministers, who should be specially charged with evangelical ministrations to the people in villages, and with the pastoral oversight of them and of their children, this Meeting recommends to the Conference that direction be given to the Committee of Management to pay special attention to this question during the coming year, and to the largely-increased expenditure which must result from it, if the village population of our land shall be more adequately provided for. This Committee further recommends to the Conference that special effort should be forthwith made by the Connexion for defraying the debt upon the Fund, and for increasing that Fund, so as to enable it to meet the pressing calls now made for the employment of Home-Missionary Ministers.

Moved by Mr. Thomas May, of Bristol; seconded by Mr. Elkanah Healey, of Liverpool:

2. That the Conference be requested to recommend that, at the ensuing Financial District Meetings held throughout the country, a local District Sustentation Fund Committee be appointed. That this Committee consist of lay gentlemen, being members of Society, and living within the District. That the object of this Committee be to raise the minimum allowance in every Circuit to £150 per annum, with the customary addition of house-rent, taxes, etc. That for the attainment of this object local subscriptions be raised whereby to enable the Committee to supplement the income of Ministers until the minimum be obtained. That, in order to encourage local effort, it shall be a fundamental rule of the Committee never to make a grant beyond a moiety of the increase of the allowance to be paid, such other moiety being raised by the aid of the Circuit itself.

Moved by the Rev. Joseph Bush; seconded by Mr. T. W Pocock:

3. That this Committee is glad to learn that the efforts of the Committee of Management to augment the insufficient allowances of many of the Ministers in our claimant Circuits are being met, in several cases, by corresponding local exertions; but whilst the debt upon the Fund, now amounting to more than $\pounds 8,000$, renders it inexpedient to increase the grants now made for ordinary deficiencies, the Committee hopes that the encouragement held out to increase the allowances of our Ministers in claimant Circuits will be continued until the object contemplated shall be more fully realised.

Moved by the Rev. H. W Williams; seconded by Mr. Bainbridge, of Newcastle :

4. That the thanks of this Committee be given to those Ministers and friends who have advocated the claims of our Home Missions during the year; to those who have given invaluable personal labour to our Mission work; to the subscribers and collectors; and to those young persons and children who have been successfully engaged in Juvenile Associations.

William Shaw; the appointment and action of various Sub-Committees, which had considered the following subjects .--the Elementary Education Act, 1870, the Education Act Amendment Bill, the position and prospects of the Education Fund, the legal position of Day-School property, the formation of a Connexional Sunday-School Union; the issue of a Circular in reference to the use of Wesleyan Catechisms in the Day Schools ; the revision of "the Plan of Wesleyan Education ;" the adoption of proposals made by the Rev. Gervase Smith for the extinction of the debt on the Westminster chapel ; and various other matters.

11.-DAY SCHOOLS,

The number of Day Schools is 912, an increase of 2; Scholars 171,372, an increase of 4,967; average attendance 111,984, an increase of 5,475.

The amount of Children's Pence during the year, was £65,460 7s. 3d., being an increase of $\pm 5,534$ 13s. 10d.; the amount of Government Annual Grants to Wesleyan Schools in 1872-3, was $\pm 61,261$ 11s. 6d., being an increase on the previous year of $\pm 11,331$ 12s. 6d.; subscriptions, etc., $\pm 20,865$ 13s. 5d.; decrease, ± 408 10s. 11d. Total Income, $\pm 147,587$ 12s. 2d.; increase, $\pm 16,457$ 15s. 5d. The amount of salaries, including payments to Assistants, Pupil-Teachers, etc., was $\pm 98,597$ 5s. 2d., increase, $\pm 10,715$ 14s. 6d.; other expenses, $\pm 52,486$ 13s. 5d.; increase, $\pm 6,647$ 8s. 9d. Total Cost $\pm 151,083$ 18s. 7d.; increase $\pm 17,363$ 3s. 3d.

Thirteen new inspected Schools were opened during the year in new buildings, and twenty-two were commenced in existing buildings. Thirty-seven Outfit Grants to thirty-nine departments were paid, amounting to $\pounds 1, 226$.

The number of Certificated Teachers employed in Wesleyan Schools on the 31st of December, 1872, was 840.

The number of Pupil-Teachers and Candidates returned in March last, was 1,874, being an increase on the corresponding period of the previous year of 155. The Annual Examination of Pupil-Teachers in Religious Knowledge was held in accordance with the decision of the Conference. (See Minutes, 1872, Vol. XVIII., p. 640.) 1,704 Pupil-Teachers and Candidates sat for examination. The Report of the Board of Examiners was presented to the General Education Committee in April last, and an Abstract has since been published.

III.-SUNDAT SCHOOLS.

The number of Sunday Schools is 5,689, increase 77; Teachers and Officers 108,446, increase 719; Ditto in Society or on trial 80,671, increase 869; Scholars 666,766, increase 12,189; Ditto in Society or on trial 42,056, increase 1,838; in Select Classes, 22,068, increase 293; Young Persons in Bible-Classes conducted by Ministers and others, 21,805, increase 8,024. Number of Libraries 2,301, increase 52; volumes 591,417, increase 14,082; readers 101,577, increase 3,895. Schools in which the Catechisms are used 4,554, decrease 47; Schools where children are regularly taken to chapel 4,950, decrease 22. Annual Cost £42,553 8s. 2d. Number of Circuit Unions reported, 113.

The Treasurers presented a Financial Statement.

The Visitor of Day and Sunday Schools read an Abstract of his Report.

The Rev. T. B. Stephenson, B.A., read a statement respecting "The Children's Home."

The following Resolutions were unanimously adopted :---

On the motion of the Rev. W Arthur, M.A.; seconded by Mr. T. C. Squance, of Sunderland; and supported by the Ex-President, the Rev. Dr. James:

1. That this Meeting is thankful to learn that the interests entrusted to the oversight of the Education Committee are generally in a prosperous condition; and especially, that the two Training Colleges have been so fully occupied during the year, and have been worked with such satisfactory results. The Meeting is glad to find that the income of the year 1872 showed some increase on that of 1871; and that it was so far in excess of the current expenditure as to permit a considerable sum to be earried to the capital account; but, in view of the very heavy debt with which the Fund will be chargeable at the end of the present year, the Meeting deems it of grave importance that the annual income of the Fund be increased to the amount proposed when the Conference resolved upon the establishment of the additional Training College.

On the motion of the Rev. Dr. Rigg; seconded by Mr. W Mewburn, of Banbury; and supported by Mr. T. P. Bunting, of London, and Mr. Barlow, of Bolton:

2. That this Meeting hears with much gratification of the extended and successful operations of "The Children's Home." It recognises the special work undertaken by that institution as highly important, both in its social and religious aspects, and expresses an earnest hope that its efficiency will be maintained and advanced, and that adequate contributions will continue to be provided for its support.

On the motion of the Rev. Frederic Greeves; seconded by Mr. T. Moscrop, of Bolton; and supported by the Rev. Joseph Hargreaves:

3. That this Meeting learns with satisfaction that measures for the improvement of Wesleyan-Methodist Sunday Schools have occupied the attention of the Education Committee during the year, and that proposals for the formation of a Connexional Sunday-School Union are to be submitted to the Conference for consideration. The Meeting believes that such a Union, if wisely constructed and vigorously worked, will tend to encourage the Connexional element in the character and operations of our Sunday Schools, and to render them more efficient in management, in methods of instruction, and in spiritual results.

ABSTRACT OF THE REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON HIGHER EDUCATION.

1. The Special Committee appointed by the Conference to consider the question of Higher Education, and the steps which the Conference should take to avail itself of the altered circumstances in University towns, appointed a Sub-Committee to make various inquiries, and especially to consider the expediency of acquiring the Leys Estate in Cambridge for the purpose of a High School. The Report of the Sub-Committee is embodied in the following suggestions := -

"1 That it is desirable to establish a good public School upon the Leys Estate, Cambridge.

"2. That it is desirable to receive boys from the **age** of ten years upwards; but that the junior division of the School reside in a separate building.

"3. That the School be under Methodist management, but be perfectly open to boys belonging to other Churches.

"4. That all the boys resident in the School shall attend a Wesleyan-Methodist place of worship.

"5. That, if a Chaplain be appointed to the School, he shall be non-resident, and his appointment shall rest with the Wesleyan-Methodist Conference.

"6. That an effort be made to raise not less than $\pm 15,000$ by means of nominations, the right to a nomination for life being offered for ± 100 , the right to a single nomination for ± 50 .

"7 That if $\pm 15,000$ can be thus raised, it is desirable to contemplate the immediate erection on the Leys Estate of buildings suitable to the accommodation of 250 boys, on a plan admitting of enlargement; funds for such erection to be raised, if necessary, upon mortgage.

"8. That it is desirable, at least for the present, to admit to the School those boys only who obtain nominations.

"9. That the ordinary annual charge for pupils thus nominated be eighty guineas, this sum including all items usually included in the annual charge at the best schools of similar character; but that the nominees of all persons who shall qualify as Donors, (by the gift of £50,) or as Life Donors, (by the gift of £100,) before the sum of £15,000 has been raised for the purchase of the Leys Estate, shall be admitted during the first five years at a reduced rate of charge, viz., at the rate of seventyfive guineas per annum for the nominee of a Donor, and at the rate of seventy guineas per annum for the nominee of a Life Donor. These fees will, of course, be somewhat lower in the junior division.

"[If 100 boys be thus obtained for the first year, the income of the School will fully meet the annual expenditure, which, calculated upon the most liberal scale, can searcely exceed for education, £2,350, maintenance, (including Rates, Taxes, etc.,) £4,000, interest on money borrowed, (for building and furnishing, see No. 7,) £650, making a total of £7,000.]

"10. That the Governing Body be appointed according to the following scheme :---

"The Governing Body shall consist of twenty Governors.

"The President of the Conference for the time being, the Secretary, and the Ex-President of the Conference, shall be Governors ex-officio.

"Two Governors shall be appointed by the officers, viz., the Theological and Classical Tutors, the House Governors, and Assistant Tutors, (if Ministers in full connexion,) of the three Branches of the Wesleyan Theological Institution.

"Three Governors (one of whom shall be the Principal of one of the Wesleyan Training Colleges) shall be elected by the General Education Committee.

"One Governor shall be elected by the resident Masters of the School.

"Eleven Governors shall be elected by the first Life Donors, *i.e.*, those who become Life Donors before the sum of £15,000 has been raised for the purchase of the Leys Estate; each Life Donor having in such election one vote in virtue of each nomination which he holds.

"N.B.—No Master shall be a Governor.

"11. That when these first Life Donors shall be so far reduced in number as to represent less than one hundred nominations, it is desirable that the number of Governors to be elected by the first Life Donors according to the above scheme be diminished according to a sliding scale; and that the additional Governors uccessary to make up the original number of twenty be elected partly by the Governors for the time being, and partly by subsequent Life Donors, according to a scheme to be afterwards settled."

These recommendations were adopted by the Special Committee, and referred to the favourable consideration of the Conference.

II. The Special Committee further recommended to the Conference the suggestion contained in the following portion of the Report of the Sub-Committee :—

"The establishment of a Hostel for undergraduates in close connection with the School is, we think, altogether undesirable. Nor can we recommend the opening of any Hostel in the technical sense of the word, as denoting a honse (presided over by a Cambridge graduate) occupied by those only who are not members of a College If, however, a Minister were appointed by the Conference as Chaplain to the School, he might receive into his house undergraduates, (who might or might not be members of a College,) and young men wishing to enter the University: and we believe that such an arrangement would be productive of many advantages. Methodist parents would have confidence in sending sons to the University, if they could place them for a time nuder the care of one whom they themselves knew, and in whom they could place implicit trust. Undergraduates have carnestly desired to find a Minister with whom their relation might be more intimate than with their College Tutor. This plan, which we earnestly recommend, was, in the first instance, suggested by men of the highest eminence in the University, and has been favourably received by all with whom we have conversed on the subject. The relation between such a Minister and those under his care would not admit of great strictness of discipline, but would open a field for influence of the most powerful and beneficial kind, which would last long after the undergraduate had passed into a College, or had left the University. An appointment of this kind would, we believe, be favourably regarded by the University authorities, and would be welcomed

by many who were not themselves inmates of the House. The plan, if it proved successful, might with advantage be extended to Oxford."

III. The Special Committee also adopted and referred to the Conference the scheme proposed by the Rev. Frederic Greeves, and sanctioned by the Sub-Committee, for the improvement of Methodist Trust Property in Oxford. On this subject the Sub-Committee reported :—

"The enlargement and alteration of the Chapel, the extinction of the existing debt, the erection of vestries and a Minister's house, will require an expenditure amounting to nearly £5,000. The deputation appointed to visit Oxford had the opportunity of examining Mr. Greeves' plans; and we join in heartily recommending that he be authorized to carry them into effect, and that efforts be made to raise the requisite funds. The proposition before us is characterized by great moderation and practical good sense: if it receive the sanction of the Committee and the Conference, we cannot doubt that the interests of Methodism in the University and in the city of Oxford will be greatly promoted."

Q. IV What Ministers have DIED since the last Conference?

A. 1. In Great Britain, the twenty-two following :-

(1.) JAMES ALLEN (B), son of the Rev James Allen; who finished his course at Bramley, August 30th, 1873, at the close of the fifty-first year of his life, and the twenty-seventh of his ministry. He was born at Uttoxeter, and educated at Kingswood School; and was converted to God in the year 1840, in the town of Sheffield, under a sermon by the late Rev. John Henley Twelve months afterwards he began to preach the truth that had "made him free." In 1844 he was recommended for the office of the Christian ministry, and after two years spent at Didsbury, he entered upon his work under a deep and even oppressive sense of its importance. In all his Circuits the Lord gave him fruit of his labour, and the esteem and confidence of his colleagues and the people. Intelligence, love, purity of life, sympathy with the suffering, unwearied attention to the poor, singleness of aim, forgetfulness of self, and an all but unvarying Christian cheerfulness, characterized him throughout. Ile took great interest in the spiritual well-being of the young, and was very successful in conducting Bible and theological classes He was an able theologian, and a wise and always profitable preacher. During his last illness, though oppressed with weakness, and deprived of the joy of his accustomed labour, he was sustained by the conviction that, through grace, "some better thing" was prepared for him, and found rest in submission to the Divine will. For some weeks before his death he slept almost continuously, but more than once broke out in ejaculations of prayer and praise. A few days before the closing scene, he awoke with a cheerful smile, and, raising his hands with considerable energy. exclaimed, "Praise, praise Him for ever-for ever !" When the end came, he was ready; and, with no trace of suffering left, breathed his sanctified spirit into the hands of God.

(2.) WILLIAM SEED; who was born at Scorton, in the Garstang Circuit, September 15th, 1838, and died at Brightlingsea, in the Colchester Circuit, September 23rd, 1873. In early life he was the subject of gracious impressions, which were fostered by the example and influence of his godly mother, and the instruction received in the Sabbath-school of his native village. When twelve years of age he obtained the pardoning love of God, and at once began to meet in class; and the great change which he experienced in youth was manifested throughout his after life. At the Conference of 1860, he was accepted as a candidate for the ministry. Having passed through a course of training at Richmond, he laboured with diligence and success in the several Circuits to which he was appointed during his brief ministerial career. His preaching was instructive and profitable, showing that careful thought had been employed in the preparation of his sermons. As a pastor and friend he was greatly beloved, especially by those who knew him intimately. He was naturally of an even temperament, and his Christian character was uniformly consistent. He was a faithful and valued colleague : trusting others, he was trusted in return. On the last Sabbath but onc before his death, though in great physical weakness, he preached with remarkable impressiveness. His mortal illness was brief, but very severe : during an interval of consciousness, not long before his departure, he testified to his having experienced a glorious manifestation of the presence of God to his soul. Speaking to his sorrowing wife on the value of sanctified affliction, he said, "I have learned more in this week's affliction than during all my life before, and shall be the better for it as long as I live." His sudden removal in the prime of his days, and in the midst of his usefulness, occasioned deep and wide-spread sorrow. He finished his earthly course in the twelfth year of his ministry.

(3.) ROBERT HENRY HARE; who was the youngest son of the late Rev. Edward Hare. He was born in Liverpool, March, 1816, and died at Dunstable, in October, 1873. The confidence of his dying father was, in the case of Robert Henry, from carliest life clearly fulfilled : addressing his wife, who was kneeling at his side, he said, "God will be yours, -a Father to the dear children. Give my love to them : I only care for their souls." Characterized from boyhood by great seriousness of mind, he was, at the age of twelve, and whilst a scholar at Woodhouse Grovc, induced to give himself to God and His people. At the age of twenty he was received on probation for the ministry, and appointed to Hornsea. For a period of thirtyfive years he maintained a blamcless reputation, his character being ever in accordance with the principles and precepts of Christianity. In temperament he was exceedingly sensitive. By reading, study, and careful observation he diligently sought to acquire material wherewith to discharge with efficiency the duties to which his life was consecrated. His preaching was chiefly expository. He was judicious in the selection of texts, and anxious to give their meaning with clearness and force to

his congregation. In the treatment of his subjects he was methodical and Scriptural; and his appeals to his hearers were frequently most impressive. As a colleague and Superintendent. he was genial, prudent, and impartial, and hence greatly beloved. For the work of the Christian pastor his gentleness of spirit, his sympathy, his courteous manners, and withal his unfeigned love for the cause of God, eminently qualified him. Scarcely had he entered, amid great searchings of heart and in earnest hope of being more than ever useful, upon a second year's labour in the Dunstable Circuit, when an inscrutable Providence permitted him to be fatally afflicted. From the commencement to the end of his illness his sufferings were very acute, but great was the sustaining power of Divine grace. While the issue was still uncertain, he said, "I only wish to live that I may be increasingly ambitious to do more for my Saviour;" and again. "I cast aside every rag of self-rightcousness, and take Jesus only. God knows how much I long for holiness and rest in Christ." Exceedingly comprehensive and impressive were the views of Scriptural holiness given him during the last few days of his life, and his whole spirit scemed eager to realise that "perfect love" to which it is the privilege of believers in Christ to attain. In strong paroxysms of pain he breathed the words,-

> "With me in the fire remain, "Till like burnish'd gold I shine, Meet, through consecrated pain, To see the Face Divine."

On the morning of October 11th, 1873, resting thus assuredly in Christ, he entered the "inheritance of the saints in light," in the fifty-eighth year of his age, and the thirty-sixth of his ministry.

(4.) JOHN STABLES RIDSDALE; who was born at Ribstone-Little, Yorkshire, on July 2nd, 1817. He was descended from an old Methodist family, and grew up under religious influences. From childhood he was the subject of deep conviction, and at the age of fifteen he obtained the "knowledge of salvation by the remission of sins." A few years later, in 1839, he was admitted as a student at Abney House. His piety was sincere, humble, earnest, and consistent; and was constantly nurtured by habits of strict self-scrutiny and private devotion. In his conduct towards others, honesty and manliness, the result of an unflinching fidelity to right principles, were ever manifest; yet these stronger qualitics were so combined with Christian gentleness and love as to secure not only the respect, but also the affection and confidence of those who knew him. His acquaintance with the Christian scheme was comprehensive and thorough; and his theological views were held with a firmness and tenacity that knew no wavering. The doctrines so surely believed by him, were preached with great fidelity and power; whilst the

duties and obligations of religion were enforced by motives the most solemn and weighty, and by a singular closeness and conclusiveness of reasoning. His sermons were carefully prepared and effectively delivered, and often very searching in their character. In dealing with the conscience, and in the application of Divine truth to the daily business of life, he had few equals. He was an "able minister of the New Testament," "a workman that needed not to be ashamed." As a colleague, he was frank and generous, and was both trusted and beloved by those who were associated with him in the ministry. His health, enfeebled for many years, completely failed during his superintendency of the Weston-super-Mare Circuit; and in July, 1873, anxious to be near his children, he removed to Walsall. Here his sufferings became great, and his prostration extreme : but, amidst all, he reposed his faith in the Divine wisdom and "My only hope," he said, "is in the Atonement of goodness. When unable to speak connectedly, his mind was evi-Christ." dently engaged in the great theme of his ministry. On Sunday, November 2nd, 1873, he entered upon the rest and blessedness of Paradise, in the fifty-seventh year of his age, and the thirtyfourth of his ministry.

(5.) MATTHEW CRANSWICK; who was born at Ingmanthorpe, Yorkshire, March 10th, 1799. He was favoured with eminently pious parents, under whose godly teaching he early became the subject of deep religious impressions. At the age of fourteen he received the Divine assurance that God for Christ's sake had forgiven his sins, which assurance he retained uninterruptedly throughout his life. In 1829 he was appointed by the Conference to Cape-Breton, in British North America, where his ministry was signally owned of God in the conversion of sinners and the establishment of Methodism; and where his memory is still precious to very many who are the fruit of his zealous and indefatigable labours. After his return to this country he occupied several important Circuits, in which he was exceedingly useful, especially amongst the young. He was distinguished for great simplicity and transparency of character, and for deep attachment to the doctrines and polity of Wesleyan-Methodism. As a preacher, he was earnest and evangelical; as a pastor, diligent and sympathizing; and as a Superintendent, considerate and faithful. For several years prior to his death he was unable, through bodily infirmity, to take the work of a Circuit, or even preach occasionally; but, as opportunity permitted, he sought to support the varied agencies employed for the spiritual benefit of those around him. In his last illness his confidence in Christ was strong, and his hope of heaven bright. He died in great peace, at Eastbourne, on December 6th, 1873, in the seventyfifth year of his age, and the forty-fifth of his ministry.

(6.) WILLIAM ILLINGWORTH; who was born of Methodist

parents, at Blackburn, in 1806. He was converted to God in early life, and at the age of sixteen became a Local-preacher. In 1829 he entered upon the work of the ministry, and his preaching, particularly in Bacup, Ashton-under-Lyne, Glasgow. and Bristol, was blessed to the awakening and conversion of many souls. Indeed, for twenty years his public labours, both in the pulpit and on the platform, were eminently acceptable and useful. In 1864, a railway accident compelled him to become a Supernumerary Subsequent afflictions appear to have been made a blessing to him. In his last illness he said, with emphasis. "I wish I had served God better. My sufferings have been sanctified to me. God is my Rock : Christ is my hope : in His atoning blood I put my trust." He died at Luzley-Brook, in the Oldham (Wesley) Circuit, on the 17th of December, 1873, in the sixty-seventh year of his age, and the forty-fifth of his ministry.

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(7.) THOMAS JEFFERY; who was born at Cawson, near Devonport, and was early brought to a saving knowledge of the truth. He entered the ministry in 1827, and for thirty-two years faithfully and successfully discharged its duties, until a mysterious dispensation of Providence laid him aside. His affliction was long and painful; but for a short time before his departure his health greatly improved, and he was desirous to work for his Divine Master to the full extent of his strength. He felt and manifested a deep interest in the work of God. The ailment that terminated in death was of a very depressing nature, and while passing through it, he said but little; but what he did say was satisfactory. He entered into his eternal rest on the 16th of January, 1874, in the seventy-sixth year of his age, and the forty-seventh of his ministry.

(8.) RICHARD ALLEN (A); who had the advantages of a Methodist training. He was converted in early life, and entered the ministry in 1810. Labouring for some years amongst a scattered population in mountainous districts, he endured many hardships, eheerfully volunteering in severe winters to take the country work of his more aged colleagues. One who knew him well expressed the opinion that he "would encounter any difficulty to save souls." It pleased God to allow him to witness some remarkable instances of success. He applied himself assiduously to the pursuit of theological knowledge, and was in a more than ordinary degree conversant with the Holy Scriptures. For a long period his name stood on the Minutes as a Supernumerary, but he continued to pursue a steady course of pulpit and pastoral service, with acceptability and usefulness, until "the rush of numerous years" deprived him of the power. He was eminently upright and devout, and God did not cast him off "in the time of old age," nor forsake him "when his strength failed;" for he was enabled to bear with patience the labour and sorrow of complicated and increasing infirmities. He looked into the future without dismay, peacefully awaiting the coming of his Lord; and exchanged "the burden of the flesh" for joy and felicity on January 27th, 1874, in the eighty-sixth year of his age, and the sixty-fourth of his ministry.

(9.) GEORGE SCOTT, D.D.; who was born in Edinburgh, on the 18th of June, 1804. He was educated for commercial life, but his early dedication to God made him, even in youth, a diligent student of the Bible, and of the literature which is devoted to the elucidation of the Sacred Books. The discipline of his home life brought out the natural energy and self-reliance of his character, and when he gave his heart to God, everything was consecrated with it. He entered our ministry in 1830, and was appointed a missionary to Sweden. This was at that time a field that presented peculiar difficulties to a foreign labourer, and the skill and fidelity with which the young missionary mastered them, and the extraordinary success of his labours during a period of twelve years, are familiar to the Christian world as a classic story in missionary annals. The persecution that drove him from Sweden was as honourable to himself as it was disgraceful to those whom a faithful and fearless ministry had made his enemies. He revisited Stockholm in 1859, and saw fields which hc had sown in tears, twenty years before, white unto the harvest. He was received with enthusiasm by all classes, and hundreds of people, including persons of high rank and clergymen, hailed him as their spiritual father. His labours in this country, if not equally conspicuous, were equally faithful. In 1866 he was appointed President of the Conferences of Canada and Eastern British America. He was a good preacher, an eloquent advocate of Missions, and a judicious and able colleague : in every position in which the confidence of his brethren placed him, as Chairman of a District, or President of an affiliated Conference, hc fulfilled his trust with diligence, singular disinterestedness, and fidelity. His spirit was eminently catholic; and while a faithful Methodist preacher, he was a servant of the Church of Christ, helping to the best of his opportunities those great movements, such as the Bible Society and the Evangelical Alliance, in which all who name the name of Christ are equally concerned. The close of his life was a beautiful consummation of Christian service. He who had been indefatigable in work was equally steadfast in suffering, and he "finished his course with joy, and the ministry," which he had "received of the Lord Jesus, to testify the Gospel of the grace of God." He died in Glasgow, on January 28th, 1874, in the seventieth year of his age, and the forty-fourth of his ministry.

(10.) THOMAS HARDING; who was born at Usk, in Monmouthshire, on the 14th of February, 1819. Of his parentage and early life he has left no record, nor is it known at what age he

was brought to the knowledge of Christ as his Saviour. From an account recently given by himself, it appears that for many weeks he was oppressed by fears lest his repentance was not sufficiently deep and sincere; but, in a prayer-meeting which was held after a lovefeast, the words, "If ye then, being evil. know how to give good gifts unto your children, how much more shall your Father which is in heaven give good things to them that ask Him ?" were so forcibly applied that his fears were dispelled, and the satisfying assurance of adoption through Christ was given him. He was sent to the Theological Institution at Didsbury in 1842, and entered upon the work of the ministry in 1844. in the Monmouth Circuit. His preaching was instructive and evangelical, and his teaching was enforced by a consistent His remarkable equanimity and cheerfulness, while recomlife. mending the religion he professed, helped to foster happy pastoral intercourse with his people. On Sunday morning, February 22nd, he was preaching in the chapel at Whitehaven, from the words, "The God of all grace, who hath called us unto His eternal glory by Christ Jesus, after that ye have suffered a while, make you perfect, stablish, strengthen, settle you." He had dwelt much upon the excellence of the reward which God has appointed for His servants, and the graciousness of God in calling those who so ill-deserve it to His own "glory," when, drawing to the conclusion of his discourse, and whilst quoting the passage, ". In whom all the building fitly framed together," ' the Master Himself called, and he entered into the "eternal glory" of which he had been speaking. He died in the fifty-sixth year of his age, and the thirtieth of his ministry.

(11.) GEORGE HOBILL; who was born at Daventry, in the year 1811. His parents were eminently pious, and trained up their children "in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." Through the exhortations and prayers of his mother, his mind was early impressed with the importance of Divine things. When about seventeen years of age, he sought and obtained mercy through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ. He soon began to preach, and was instrumental in the awakening and conversion of many souls. In 1834, after much inward conflict, he became a candidate for our ministry. For nearly forty years he prosecuted his evangelical labours with diligence, fidelity, and His natural abilities were good, and his instructive success. discourses were highly valued by the intelligent and devout. He was a zealous preacher of the Gospel, and in some cases he was permitted to gather precious fruit. The affliction which terminated his life was short, but peculiarly painful. He preached with his usual energy only a few days before his death, and thus almost ceased "at once to work and live." He endured excruciating pain with remarkable patience, and his gratitude for the least attention paid him was great. In the

certain prospect of speedy departure, his mind was calm and his faith unshaken. When told that his malady was likely to be fatal, he said, with a smile, "The will of the Lord be done." To a friend who whispered, "In My Father's house are many mansions," he replied, with a countenance lit up with joy, "O, my home is there; my portion is there; my *heart* is there!" To the question, "Is Jesus near?" he answered, "O, yes!" He died at Swanage, February 27th, 1874, in the sixty-third year of his age, and the fortieth of his ministry.

(12.) ADAM NIGHTINGALE; who was born at Oundle. August 25th. 1789. He was not favoured with an early religious training, but, notwithstanding this disadvantage in his youth, he was frequently the subject of gracious emotions, checks of conscience, and alarming fears. As he approached manhood, he was brought by various circumstances under the influence of Methodist teaching; and his attention to the Word preached issued in his conversion to God. In 1822 he was called to the work of the ministry. The first few months of his Itinerancy were spent in Circuits at home, where his services were highly appreciated, after which he was appointed to labour in Newfoundland. He entered upon his duties there full of heart and hope, and in their faithful and energetic discharge was uninterruptedly engaged for nearly forty years. His health then failing, he was obliged to return to England, entirely incapacitated for public service. But his spirit never lost its missionary ardour. Mr. Nightingale was modest and unobtrusive in his general demeanour, yet in the cause of Christ lacked neither courage nor firmness. He was a man of deep and ardent piety, and his love for souls was intense. His preaching was plain, but thoroughly evangelical and practical, and his appeals to the hearts of his hearers were earnest and powerful; in various places in which he exercised his ministry he had fruit of his labours. A complaint from which he suffered for a protracted period tended to impair his nervous system, in consequence of which, during the latter part of his life, he was the subject of frequent doubts and fears regarding his spiritual safety; but in his most depressed state, he clung to the Atonement of Christ with great simplicity of mind. Almost his last words were. "Talk to me of Jesus." He died on March 29th, 1874, in the eighty-fifth year of his age, and the fifty-second of his ministry.

(13.) NICHOLAS BISHOP, M.A.; who was born at St. Allen, Cornwall, on July 4th, 1829. The godly training of a pious mother led him early to religious decision: in his seventeenth year he sought and found the covenant grace of God, and joined the Wesleyan-Methodist Society in Truro. Two years after, moved by the Holy Ghost, he became a Local-preacher. Discouraged from entering into our ranks, he laboured as a faithful and successful minister in another branch of the Christian Church for nearly eight years. At the Conference of 1860 he was received as a minister amongst us, and subsequently travelled in some of our principal Circuits. His mind was comprehensive and active; his emotions refined and elevated; his will calm but resolute; and his judgment sound, discriminating, and charitable. His spiritual life was deep and fervent, and became the mainspring of his motives and the regulator of his conscience. During his ministerial course he steadily increased in power and efficiency. His sermons were truly evangelical, and full of Methodist teaching; and though under the influence of his metaphysical studies, they sometimes ran into moulds of thought unfamiliar to ordinary congregations, yet were they usually plain, practical, and soul-saving. He was a faithful colleague, a diligent and loving visitor of the members of his flock, and was specially mindful of their families. He was a man of noble and lofty aims: his book on "Human Power in the Divine Life" is a suggestive contribution to the study of mental philosophy as it bears on the province of theology. Four months before his death he was laid aside by sickness. He keenly felt the trial, but in the midst of it Divine grace enabled him to say, "I am in harmony with all the great harmonies; there is nothing in the past on which I can look with satisfaction: its best is sinful; but I can rest in God. My health is gone; my heart and my flesh are going, —are failing; 'but God is the strength of my heart and my portion for ever." He peacefully entered into rest on April 14th, 1874, in the forty-fifth year of his age, and the twenty-second of his entire ministry.

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(14.) RICHARD RAY; who was born at Ulverstone, in Lancashire, on the 5th of April, 1800. He was brought to a sense of his need of salvation when about fifteen years of age, and, having obtained peace with God, soon afterwards began to preach the Gospel. In 1824 he was designated for the then new Mission to the Friendly Islands, and his passage was bespoken. Unforeseen difficulties arising, his place was occupied by the Rev. John Thomas, and Mr. Ray entered upon labours at home which extended through more than forty years. Long-continued toil for the promotion of Methodism, often in circumstances of extreme difficulty, did much to lay the foundation of the disease which at last proved fatal to him. In 1867, through failure of health, he was compelled to relinquish the full work of the ministry, and he retired to Bristol, where he spent the rest of his life in such ministerial and pastoral service as his strength permitted. He was naturally gifted with untiring energy and perseverance. His powers of organization and administration were considerable, and were acknowledged by the Conference, which more than once confided to him the management of affairs requiring exemplary tact and patience. His name will ever be associated with the Wesleyan Collegiate Institution, Taunton, in the establishment of which he took an active part, and of which he was the first governor. As a preacher, he was earnest and practical, and his labours were manifestly owned of God; as a pastor, faithful, and full of tenderness when sorrow called for sympathy; as a friend, frank, generous, and true. His last affliction was long, and very painful, but it was borne with a patient trust which accorded well with the manliness and consistency of his Christian life. To the last his intellect was unclouded, and his humble reliance upon Divine mercy through the Atonement of Christ found frequent expression. A little before his death he remarked, referring to an obituary of a brother minister which he had prepared, "If anything is said of me when I am gone, let it be that I am resting here :—

> 'He calls a worm His friend, He calls Himself my God; And He shall save me to the end, Through Jesu's blood.'

My imperfections are covered by His infinite merits: my debt is paid; I trust in the blood of Jesus." His last utterance was a prayer for his children, as they gathered around his bed in the early morning of Tuesday, April 21st, 1874, when he exchanged the weakness and suffering of this present life for the rest and glory of the world to come. He died in the seventy-fifth year of his age, and the fifty-first of his ministry.

(15.) JOHN COLWILL REDDAWAY; who was born near Okehampton, January 28th, 1842. He was not blessed with Methodist training, and had but few religious advantages when young. The Holy Spirit, however, often moved upon his heart, and led him to inquire after truth. Meeting with the Life of the Rev. Dr. Newton, he read it with care; and the impressions thus received eventually led him to the Saviour. When nineteen years of age, he was accepted as a candidate for our ministry, and after two years' training in the Institution at Richmond, he was appointed to a Circuit in 1863. In all his Circuits he made "full proof of his ministry;" and by the catholicity of his spirit and the kindliness of his demeanour won the affectionate esteem of many in all sections of the Christian Church. He was an earnest and acceptable preacher, an indefatigable pastor, paying especial attention to the poor, a genial and trustworthy friend and colleague, and a godly and consistent man in every department of life. He sought to be useful, and God gave him the desire of his heart; in every sphere in which he laboured, the cause of God was both consolidated and extended. He fell at his post. During the whole of his brief but very severe affliction, he was full of peace, and often requested his wife to "help him to praise God." He passed from toil to triumph at Middleton, in the Oldham (Manchester-Street) Circuit, May 5th, 1874, in the thirty-third year of his age, and the eleventh of his ministry.

(16.) RICHARD HEAPE; who was born at Hartley, near Rochdale, April 12th, 1789. He was blessed with a pious ancestry, and very early in life was induced to devote himself to God. Soon after his conversion he became desirous to lead others to the enjoyment of the same salvation. In the year 1813 he was appointed to a Circuit, and for forty-one years pursued his ministerial and pastoral labours with diligence, acceptance, and success. He retired from the Itincrancy in the year 1854; and from that time, in a more limited sphere, glorified God in both doing and suffering His will. Mr. Heape was a man of great simplicity of character, and was eminently devout and conscientious. Throughout his career he was distinguished by his courtesy and his gentlemanly deportment; by kindliness and gentleness, by generosity to the poor, and liberality to the cause of God in general; by catholicity of spirit, and devotedness to the Church of his choice. When the Master called, His servant was found ready, and was enabled to commit himself unto God "as unto a faithful Creator." He died on Wednesday, May 6th, 1874, in the eighty-sixth year of his age, and the sixty-first of his ministry.

(17) JAMES DALE BROCKLEHURST; who was born at Macclesfield, March 27th, 1820, and died at Grantham, June 2nd, 1874, in the fifty-fifth year of his age. He was a son of Methodist parents, and in his fifteenth year experienced the saving power of the Gospel. He began to preach very early, and during the greater part of his ministry was a diligent expositor and preacher of God's Word. As a pastor, he was exemplary; and in his attention to the young especially, whether in their homes, in private schools, or in Bible-classes, he was the instrument of more than ordinary usefulness. His unwearied pains in explaining the Old Testament economy, in itself and in its relation to the New Covenant, gave a marked value to his instructions, and probably led to the deep and abiding interest which he took in the conversion of the Jews. In connection with the Jubilee of the Missionary Society, he rendered much service as secretary; service, however, which was peculiarly laborious and exhausting. After an interval of constrained silence, he was appointed to the Grantham Circuit, where his labours won for him the esteem and confidence of the Societies. But the Great Head of the Church did not permit him to give them a full year's service. Before the year expired, repeated attacks of sickness so prostrated him that he could not rally. In the spirit of rigorous severity towards himself, but of unfailing trust in his Saviour, he met his end; and when it came, the end was peace. His last words to his faithful wife were, "I believe that the blood of Jesus Christ, His Son, cleanseth me from all sin." His memory is cherished with tender affection by very many, who rejoice that with him it was "light at eventide."

(18.) JOSEPH ROBERTS; who was born near Holmfirth, January 16th, 1790. When eighteen years of age he was converted to God, and became a member of the Wesleyan-Methodist Society. By the Conference of 1814 he was accepted as a candidate for the ministry, and he continued in full work for the long period of fifty-four years. "Full of faith and of the Holy Ghost," he was "instant in season, out of season," caring only for the salvation of souls. As a friend, he was warm-hearted, disinterested, and faithful; and as a colleague, he was invariably true and affectionate. Repudiating "fleshly wisdom," and governed only by "simplicity and godly sincerity," hc reposed great confidence in others, and was sometimes liable to be deceived by men who affected zeal for the cause of God. He was a diligent and praycrful student of the Scripturcs; his preaching was highly acceptable, and was very successful in bringing men to Christ, and in promoting the edification of the Church. As a pastor, he was attentive to the young; and, under a lively remembrance of the command, "Feed My sheep," was ceaselessly active in visiting the people of his charge. The entireness of his consecration was conspicuous during the prevalence of cholera in 1832, showing that he did not "count his life dear unto him," so that he might lead stricken ones to the Physician of souls. In 1868 he became a Supernumerary, but continued to work for Christ in Bradford-on-Avon until, about two years ago, his ability for public service entirely failed. Sometimes his affliction was very distressing, and induced depression and anxiety : while his patience was unfailing, he frequently expressed "a desire to depart, and to be with Christ." His desire was fulfilled on the 18th of June, 1874. He was upwards of eighty-four years of agc, and had been in the ministry nearly sixty years.

(19.) WILLIAM WILSON (C); who was born at Wharton-Lodge. near Wetherby, Yorkshire, September 11th, 1810. In youth he manifested that thoughtfulness which was so marked a feature of his later life. When about seventcen years of age, he prayerfully sought the Lord, frequently retiring that he might plead with God in secret for salvation. After many struggles, he at length firmly rested on the Atonement of Christ, when his soul was filled with peace, which it is believed he never afterwards lost. In 1837, after having been an accredited Local-preacher about two years, he was recommended for the ministry, accepted by the Conference, and sent to the Theological Institution, where he remained two years, receiving his first appointment to a Circuit at the Conference of 1839. From that time until his death, he pursued his work as a Methodist preacher with great acceptance and usefulness. His sermons, which were carefully prepared, were calculated to do much good. As a Superintendent, he was methodical and exact, endeavouring to "mind every point, great and small, in the Methodist discipline." He

was a lover and promoter of peace, and his life gave evidence of daily fellowship with God, and of interest in the cause of Christ. At the Conference of 1873, he was appointed to the superintendency of the Cleckheaton Circuit, where, during a few months, he passed through many sorrows, following to the tomb the remains of his second wife, a brother, and a brother-in-law. These repeated strokes he bore with fortitude, knowing that the rod of discipline was in a loving Father's hand. On Saturday evening, June 20th, 1874, he attended a band-meeting at Heckmondwike, where he resided, and on leaving said that he felt as well as usual. But it was with difficulty he reached home: in less than an hour his spirit took its flight, to enter upon the rest of the eternal Sabbath. His last words were expressive of his anxiety about the preaching-appointments in his Circuit for the morrow. He died in the sixty-fourth year of his age, and the thirty-fifth of his ministry.

(20.) THOMAS HARRISON WALKER; who was born at Heckmondwike, in 1789. When eighteen years of age he was deeply convinced of sin while attending a Love-feast in Leeds; and having sorrowed after a godly sort, he was enabled to believe with the heart unto righteousness. His holy zeal for the salvation of others led to his appointment to a class, containing forty members, beforc he had reached his twentieth year, and also to his employment as a Local-preacher. He entered the ministry in the year 1811. In the pulpit, he was earnest, practical, and powerful. He was a diligent pastor, and carried words of consolation and hope to many suffering and dying people. As an author he wisely endeavoured to impart instruction in the duties of social life, and especially to counsel the young. In 1852 he became a Supernumerary. His last illness was short and painful. During an interval of ease he requested his daughter to leave him for a short time. On her return he said, "I have had a blessed manifestation of the presence of God; words fail to express my peace, my joy; it was heaven come down to earth." He entered into rest at Southport, in the eighty-fifth year of his age, and the sixty-third of his ministry.

(21.) JOHN BROWN (C); who was born in August, 1838, at Carharrack, in the Gwennap Circuit. Accustomed from a child to attend the Wesleyan-Methodist ministry, he was at a very early age the subject of deep religious impressions. At ten years of age, he was found by his mother weeping in his chamber, with his Bible before him, when he obtained a clear sense of the love of Christ to him, and was enabled to claim God for his Father. As he grew in years his heart expanded in love to the souls of men, until he was constrained to offer himself to preach the Gospel in any part of the missionary field. After spending two years under theological training at Richmond, his constitution not being deemed suitable for the foreign work, he was

appointed to a Circuit at home. During his twelve years' ministerial course, he preached a "present, free, and full salvation" with acceptance and success. His zeal and courage in recommending the Saviour in the streets and lanes as well as in the pulpit, his faithfulness in reproving sin, his firmness in contending "for the faith once delivered to the saints," gained for him the reputation of one who was "valiant for the truth;" while his benevolent spirit, guileless simplicity, and manly deportment divested his zeal of any appearance of harshness, and procured him universal good-will. He carried the sunshine of a genial and happy disposition into every social circle which he entered. Though his health had been declining for some months. there were no signs of immediate danger; but an unexpected seizure proved fatal in twenty-six hours. In intervals of consciousness he evinced the calmness of an habitual reliance on his Saviour. He fell asleep in Jesus on July 2nd, 1874, aged nearly thirty-six years, having almost completed the twelfth year of his ministry.

(22.) JAMES MEADMORE ; who was born at Blewhenstone, near Ross, in August, 1798, and died at Maiden-Newton, July 11th, 1874. His parents were members of the Established Church, and trained their son according to its tenets. When about seventeen years old he was brought to God, partly through the instrumentality of a remarkable dream, and joined the Wesleyan-Methodist Society. In the year 1824 he was called to the ministry. After labouring diligently and successfully for fortyfive years, he became a Supernumcrary, and spent the rest of his days in the Dorchester Circuit. He was a man of meek and amiable disposition ; his piety, which was deep, was unpretending, and his life blameless and transparent. As a preacher, he was plain, practical, and earnest; and he was favoured by the Head of the Church with many seals to his ministry. In his last affliction he gave striking signs of readiness for the solemn change which awaited him. When asked, "Do you feel the Gospel you have so long preached to others now sustains you ?" he returned a cheerful affirmative reply. During his mortal languor he was much comforted in hearing and repeating some well-known portions of our hymns. His decease was preceded by a sercne slumber, from which he suddenly awoke, as if to bid a last adicu to this outer world. Without a sigh, his happy spirit took its flight to the Paradisc of God, in the seventy-sixth year of his age, and the fiftieth of his ministry.

2. In Ireland, two; viz., ---

(1.) JOHN CAREY; who was born at Faughart, near Dundalk, in the year 1784. When about fifteen years of age he was deeply convinced of sin, and having sought earnestly God's mercy, was shortly after "justified freely by His grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus." In the year 1809 he was accepted as a candidate for our ministry; his name was placed on the List of Reserve, and in the following year he was appointed to the Newtownlimavaddy Mission. After forty-five years of active service he became a Supernumerary; but in that position he ceased not to labour in the Word and doctrine as his strength permitted, till near the close of life; and the close of that upright, faithful life was singularly peaceful. Just at the last, looking steadily at the members of his family, a bright smile played upon his countenance, and he said, as if listening to the heavenly host, "Such singing! Do you not hear it?" and so fell asleep. He died in Drogheda, on the 2nd of March. 1874, in the nineticth year of his age, and the sixty-fourth of He was a man of sterling worth, unobtrusive, his ministry. cautious, and reliable; a faithful friend, a sincere and earnest Christian, and possessed of great power in prayer. His sermons were remarkable for just excgesis, for plain and faithful dealing with the conscience, and for the accompanying power of the Holy Ghost; and in the discharge of the duties of Superintendent of a Circuit, and Chairman of a District, his wise, patient firmness inspired with confidence all with whom he had to do. The large attendance at his funeral of ministers and members of various: Churches showed how much he was esteemed and loved.

(2.) THOMAS MEREDITH; whose birth-place was Cappagh, in the Qucen's County. He feared God from his childhood, and. while yet very young, a friend invited him to go with him to a class-meeting; he went, and in that means of grace, which he greatly prized to the end of his life, he learned the way of salvation by faith "which is in Christ Jesus." Some years later, under the influence of a conviction that he was called of God to preach the Word, and encouraged by those who had lovingly watched over him, he offered himself as a candidate for our ministry, and was accepted by the Conference, and appointed to a Circuit in 1828. Thenceforward, for forty years, in the active discharge of the varied duties of a Mcthodist minister, he maintained an unblemished character. He was a man of sound judgment and of great conscientiousness, was faithful in the performance of all the dutics of the ministry, and, walking closely with God, was mighty in prayer, and powerful in appeals to the conscience. His preaching was much owned of God in the conversion of sinners and in the edification of believers. He was somewhat reserved in manner, but was tender and affectionate in spirit, and a faithful and wisc friend. When, on becoming a Supernumerary, he settled in Dublin, he rendered valuable scrvice to the Church as long as any strength was given to him, and was held in high esteem by the people amongst whom he dwelt. In his last illness his sufferings were great, but being graciously sustained and comforted through communion with his

faithful Lord, he was enabled to glorify God in the fire, and amongst his latest utterances were strong expressions of confidence in and love to Him who "hath loved us, and hath given Himself for us." As his life had been even and consistent, so he peacefully departed to be "for ever with the Lord," on Thursday, the 23rd of April, 1874, in the seventy-fourth year of his age, and the forty-sixth of his ministry.

3. In our Foreign Missions, seven; viz.,-

(1.) THOMAS SKELTON DYSON, a young missionary of considerable promise, who, after three weeks' illness, died at Port-Mahon, in Spain, September 24th, 1873. He was received as a preacher on trial at the last Conference, and had laboured but a short time in the mission-work to which he had been appointed. The character of his illness prevented a last testimony to his enjoyment of the religion he had lived and preached; but no such testimony was needed by those who knew him. He had commended himself to his own people as well as to the whole community at Port-Mahon, and his death is deeply lamented.

(2.) WILLIAM HODGSON; who was born in Lancaster, on December 14th, 1807. Having been converted to God, and united in Church-fellowship with the Wesleyan-Methodist Society, he offered himself for our ministry, in 1835, and was accepted. He was appointed to labour in Jamaica, which island, in consequence of the transition of the Negrocs from slavery to freedom. was at that period cspecially interesting in a philanthropic point of view, and claimed and received a more than ordinary share of the sympathy and solicitude of the Christian public of Great Britain. Naturally earnest and thoroughly practical, a warmhearted Methodist preacher, he devoted himself fully to the work assigned him, giving evidence of being a self-denying, willing labourer in the vineyard of the Lord. He enjoyed the full confidence of his brethren, and in the working of his Circuits shrank from no toil, however hazardous or protracted. Duty with him was paramount. Ilc took an affectionate interest in the welfare of the people of his charge, and by conscientious attention to both the Sabbath and week-day schools under his care, assiduously promoted the education of their children. He possessed a cheerful disposition, and was happy in his work. The salvation of souls was the chief object of his ministry and teaching. man of faith and prayer, his preaching aimed not at display, but usefulness; and we doubt not that in the great day of account he will be found both to have saved himself and many of those who heard him. His last sickness was brought on by exposure to inclement weather, in the performance of his spiritual and ministerial dutics, when but just convalescent from a previous He died in the full triumph of faith, October 8th, 1873, illness.

at Kensington, Manchioncal, in the sixty-sixth year of his age, and the thirty-ninth of his ministry.

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(3.) HENRY WHARTON; who was born about the year 1820, in the Island of Grenada, in the West Indies. In his very youthful days he came under the gracious influences of the Holy Spirit. He was sent to Scotland for education, and on his return, in 1840, having become the subject of sound conversion to God, he was made a class-leader in the Wesleyan-Methodist Society, of which he had for some time previously been a consistent member. In 1842 he was admitted on trial as a probationer for our ministry, and appointed to labour in the Island of St. Vincent. While engaged in these early ministerial duties. his attention was powerfully drawn to the spiritual wants of those tribes of the African race-of which he was a descendantinhabiting the Western Coast of Africa, and he was at length prompted to offer himself as a missionary to the heathen. In 1846 he was appointed to take charge of the Mission in Kumasi, a post of unusual danger and hardship, where he became familiar with dreadful scenes and deeds of darkness connected with the frequent immolation of human victims. After having laboured acceptably in several Circuits, he was, in 1872, appointed General Superintendent and Chairman of the Gold-Coast District, from which date he entered on a brief period of unusual suffering and trial. Soon after his arrival at Cape-Coast the sickness commenced which eventually terminated his useful life. The disease gradually increased, until his medical adviser insisted on his leaving the Coast by the first homeward stcamer, and proceeding on a voyage to Madeira for change of air. The expected steamer was unfortunately two weeks over-due when she arrived, but he then embarked, hoping to recover. Infinite Wisdom, however, had determined to give the earnest and faithful labourer rest, and his spirit passed happily into the heavens, from Madeira, on Saturday, October the 11th, 1873. Mr. Wharton was in disposition amiable, quiet, sincere, and truly pious; he was a loving husband and father, and a faithful friend. As a Christian minister he was unassuming in his manner, a good textuarist, and consequently a good theologian. His sermons were marked by a sincere earnestness and plainness of speech, and abounded in appropriate quotations from the Holy Scriptures. He loved his ministerial duties, and gave himself wholly to them. "The memory of the just is blessed."

(4.) ISAAC WHITEHOUSE; who was born in the year 1799, in the county of Stafford. When about twelve years of age he was converted to God, under the ministry of the late Rev. Joseph Womersley, and early began to exert the powers of his renewed nature in efforts to save souls. Believing himself moved by the Holy Ghost, he offered himself for missionary work, and was accepted by the Conference of 1823. He was appointed to the Island of Jamaica, where he arrived in February, 1824; and well did his subsequent labours, and his constancy in suffering and firmness in enduring cruel opposition, justify the wisdom of the choice that had been made. He despised not the condition of the enslaved people to whom he was sent to preach "the unsearchable riches of Christ," nor did he refuse to be imprisoned in a loathsome cell to maintain his own liberty to preach Christianity to them, and their right to hear, believe, and confess the Lord Jesus. A man of exemplary stability of character and purpose, he stood in the breach, in behalf of Christian principle and truth, in a time of great civil and religious oppression and persecution. After twenty years' toil in the mission-field. he laboured with ardour and acceptance in the Circuits to which. in his native country, he was from time to time appointed. At the Conference of 1846 he returned to the West Indies, where he filled the office of Chairman and General Superintendent in the Bahama District for six years. He occupied in succession several other important spheres of labour till, early in the year 1866, growing infirmities compelled him in part to put off his armour, and retire from the high places of the field which he had before cultivated and watched over with sleepless vigilance. From his place of retirement he was taken to his crown and reward by "the Lord, the righteous Judge," on January 6th, 1874, in the seventy-fifth year of his age, and the fifty-first of his ministry.

(5.) JOHN W APPLEYARD; who was the son of one of our deceased ministers. He commenced his ministry in 1838, and from that time laboured in South Africa. In 1853 he was appointed to Mount-Coke, and entrusted with the management of the printing establishment, and with the editorial department of our work in the Graham's-Town District. He was characterized by unaffected meekness, gentleness, and love; and possessed in no ordinary degree the esteem of his brethren. It is impossible to overrate Mr. Appleyard's services to Kaffir literature. His large Philosophical Grammar of the Kaffir language, and of its various dialects, has met with the approbation of distinguished European philologists; and his labours as translator of the last edition of the Kaffir Scriptures, and as one of the revisers of the forthcoming edition, were justly regarded by his brethren, and by all other missionaries in Kaffirland, as most valuable and important. He died April 4th, 1874, in great peace,—a fitting close to a faithful and laborious life spent in the Mission cause.

(6.) JOSEPH JACKSON (B); who was born at Lily Fontein, on the Kamies Mountains, in Little Namaqualand, August 27th, 1838. As a child he was characterized by obedience to his parents, and by his love of reading and attention to religious services. When about twelve years of age he was convinced of sin, passed through a season of deep distress, and then through faith in Christ realised peace with God. In his seventeenth year he began to exercise his gifts as a Local-preacher, and his name was eventually placed on the Plan of the Pietermaritzberg Circuit. In the gracious revival of religion with which the Indaleni Circuit was favoured in the year 1859, Mr. Jackson was much interested; and in addition to his school duties, being at the time teacher of the day-school at that place, did much towards its promotion, sometimes spending the greater part of the night in praying with and exhorting the penitents, many of whom obtained salvation. Believing himself called to the work of the ministry, and passing creditably the preparatory examinations, he was recommended by the District Meeting to the Conference of 1859, and was approved. He subsequently laboured in several Circuits with great acceptance. In 1866, by the consent of the Missionary Committee, he visited England, where his pulpit and platform addresses were highly appreciated. On his return to Natal he again occupied important stations, labouring to the full measure of his strength until a severe attack of fever, accompanied with painful and dangerous aggravations, brought his valuable life to a close. He suffered much, but it was evident that in him patience had its "perfect work," and his trust in God was unshaken. Ilis piety was deep and uniform. The qualities of his mind, while not of the highest order, were of such a kind as fitted him for great usefulness in the Church. As a preacher, his praise is in all our Colonial Churches, and as a pastor, he was faithful and assiduous. He passed away to his eternal reward, on Good Friday, April 3rd, 1874, in the thirtysixth year of his age, and the fifteenth of his ministry.

(7) DAVID DE SILVA; who was born in 1817, at Belligam, a southern port of Ceylon, at which two of Dr. Coke's companions landed on their arrival in that island. The father of David de Silva was pundit to many of our earliest missionaries, and the teacher's son was thus brought into association with the pioneers of our Singhalese work. David de Silva was converted in his youth at Seedua, under the ministry of the Rev. Thomas Kilner, and ever retained the joy of his acceptance with God. He began to preach at seventeen years of age. His powers of insight and his intellectual gifts were of a superior order, and careful cultivation added greatly to their value. By long continued study in the sacred books of Buddhism, in association with the late Rev. Daniel John Gogerly, he attained a high rank as a Pali scholar. As an expounder of Buddhistic philosophy he had no equal in the native ministry of Ceylon, and his eminent power in con-The protroversy made him a centre of widening usefulness. ductions of David de Silva's pen are found in many departments of Christian literature and general knowledge, and in them he has left enduring proofs of his wide research, minute observa-

tion, and kindliness of heart. The hymns of his composition will probably be sung by the congregations of Ceylon as long as the Singhalese language endures. In preaching the Gospel he displayed his rich endowments to great advantage; he was "an eloquent man, and mighty in the Scriptures." His pastoral duties were fulfilled with affectionate conscientiousness; and he is remembered both by his brethren and our people as "a burning and a shining light." The life of this servant of Christ was closed in Colombo after a brief illness, which was but the final development of a malady from which he had long suffered : many hours and days of pain were endured without one word of distrust or murmuring. He always spoke of having unshaken faith in God, and said he was undisturbed by any assaults of Satan. On the last day of the old year he received, with his children and friends, the Lord's Supper, and manifested much solemn feeling on the oceasion. When the words were quoted in prayer, "The blood of Jesus Christ, His Son, cleanseth us from all sin," he earnestly responded, "It does." His mind was evidently clear and strong on the last evening of his life; he showed that he joined in spirit while his soul was commended to God, and that he was resting in peaceful faith on the Atonement of Christ. Later at night, his own translation, in the Singhalese, of his favourite hymn,----

" There is a fountain fill'd with blood," etc.,

was sung by those standing around his couch, when, with his remaining strength, he raised his hand in sign of triumph, and motioned to his daughter to keep it lifted until the strain, so full of faith and joy, was ended. Thus our loved and gifted brother passed away from earth to join the ranks of the "firstborn" above. He died in the fifty-seventh year of his age, after thirty-three years of consecrated service in his Master's cause.

5. The Conference adopts the following rules in relation to the Schools :---

(1.) Considering that the age at which the boys have been accustomed to leave school is the most important and valuable for the purposes of education, it is agreed that none shall henceforth be admitted into the Schools under nine years of age, and that they may remain the usual term of six years. Should parents prefer it, their sons may be admitted at ten years, and remain until sixteen years of age.

(2.) In any ease in which the Educational Allowance has been received by the parent, the claim upon the Schools' Fund shall be understood to have been met and satisfied for that year.

(3.) In all cases of an additional year being granted, on payment, to boys who have not been at school six years, the sum of $\pounds 25$ shall be paid, which sum shall be inclusive of the $\pounds 6$ 6s. from the Children's Fund; but in all cases of a request for a year additional to the six years, the payment shall be $\pounds 30$, inclusive of the $\pounds 6$ 6s. These payments shall be due in four instalments, immediately after each quarter-day. In all cases of request for an additional year, the Committee shall be satisfied that the character and diligence of the applicants are such as to render their return to the School advantageous to the other boys.

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N.B.—The regulations contained in the foregoing paragraphs (2 and 3) apply to daughters (after four years) as well as to sons.

(4.) In future, the Competition for Scholarships and Medals shall be restricted to those boys who have not been more than six years at one of the Schools.

(5.) For the convenience of the officers of the Fund, the payment for education to both boys and girls shall commence at nine years instead of eight years, and be continued until fifteen years ; the ninth year to be reckoned from the Christmas before payment.

6. Application for the admission of *daughters* to the Schools now established for them, must be made, as in the case of boys, through the District Meetings; and the allowances for those who are admitted shall not be claimed by the parents as heretofore from the Schools' and Children's Funds. The parents of *boys* in the Schools are also specially cautioned not to claim for them from the Children's Fund, much confusion having arisen in some cases from inattention to this rule.

7. The Conference directs that a certificate of health, signed by a medical practitioner, shall be required at the commencement of each term, in the case of all boys and girls received into, or returning to, our Connexional Schools.

8. The Conference adopts the following regulations in relation to the Schools for girls :---

(1.) That until as ample provision be made for the Connexional education of the daughters as for the sons of our Ministers, no girl shall be received into the Schools under *twelve* years of age, and that the time of continuance in the Schools be restricted to *four years*.

(2.) That in future each applicant be required to pass a preliminary examination, in subjects to be hereafter agreed upon, before admission to the Schools.

IMPROVEMENTS IN THE MANAGEMENT OF NEW KINGSWOOD AND WOODHOUSE GROVE SCHOOLS.

The Conference, on receiving the Report of the Special Committee appointed to act in this matter, adopted the following Resolutions :---

1. That the Resolutions 4, 5, 6 of the Conference of 1873 (see Minutes, pp. 151, 152 of this Volume) be suspended, with the exception of the first clause of Resolution 4, and that no further action be taken in connection with the Resolutions thus suspended until they have been again brought before the Conference.

2. That a Committee be appointed to consider more fully the question of concentrating the Schools in one locality, and report to the next Conference.

3. That at the commencement of the next School year, viz., in

July, 1875, there shall come into effect the concentration of the system of education in the two Schools (see Minutes, 1873, p. 151, Resolution 4), and the application of the general principles of the New Scheme of Management, which received the general approval of the Conference of 1873 (p. 152, Resolution 7); the most important of those principles being :--

(1.) That the Management of the School or Schools shall be in the hands of one Governing Body;

(2.) That the direction of the education shall be vested in one Head Master, subject to the Governing Body;

(3.) That in the place of two Schools there shall be one School in two departments, a Higher and a Lower;

(4.) That the Higher School shall be bifurcated into a Classical and a Modern School.

4. That New Kingswood be taken for the older, and Woodhouse Grove for the younger, boys.

5. That from and after July, 1875, the travelling expenses of the boys shall be defrayed out of a common Fund, on a scale to be fixed from time to time by the Governing Body, this Fund being raised by an equal charge upon every Parent for each boy whom he has at the School.

6. That as the changes resolved on by the Conference will not take effect until July, 1875, the Governing Body of the School shall not be at once appointed, but a Special Committee shall be appointed, which shall, during the ensuing year, have the powers of a Governing Body, so far as concerns the making of all needful preparations for initiating the new system of education in the School agreed on in No. 3 of the foregoing Resolutions: and that this Committee shall mature and present to the next Conference a scheme for the constitution of the Governing Body, the definition of its functions, and the general management of the School.

7. That to this Committee shall be referred the questions relating to the Schools' and Children's Funds, which the Conference of 1873 referred to a Special Committee (Minutes, p. 152, Resolution 8), power being given to this Committee to obtain from Circuits such information in relation to these Funds, and their bearing upon Circuit affairs, as may be deemed necessary.

8. That the Committee appointed by the second of the foregoing Resolutions shall consist of the members of this Special Committee, together with six members to be chosen by each of the Local Committees of New Kingswood and Woodhouse Grove Schools, the election to be made at the first Meeting of each Local Committee after the Conference.

BOOK AFFAIRS.

Q. XIV What are the Resolutions of the Conference in reference to the affairs of the BOOK-ROOM ?

A. 1. In accordance with the recommendations of the Book-Committee of Review, the Conference resolves as follows :---

(1.) The Conference adopts the Report of the London Book-Committee, and in doing so expresses its high gratification with the official communications made to it bearing upon the increased circulation of Methodist literature both at home and abroad during the past year; and while rejoicing in the marked advance of Methodist Publications as to style and attractiveness, more especially expresses its gratification at their extended circulation among the masses of the people by good cheap editions.

(2.) The Conference presents its thanks to the REV. DANIEL SANDERSON and the REV. GEORGE BOWDEN for the minute and careful examination made by them, showing that Methodist Publications will compare favourably, both in style and price, with similar publications by other establishments; and authorizes the circulation of their Report through the press as far as may be deemed desirable. (3.) The Conference approves the general basis of the New Hymn-Book, as presented by the Book-Committee, and authorizes its complete preparation and publication with all convenient speed.

(4.) With a view to the complete and final preparation of the New Hynn-Book, the following Ministers shall be associated with the members of the London Book-Committee, to meet with them for consultation and decision upon its contents as soon as further suggestions for that object shall have been obtained, such further suggestions to be forwarded to the Sceretary of the Book-Committee by the end of September next:—viz., a Representative from Ireland, to be chosen by the Representatives of the Irish Conference; the Revs. Frederick W Briggs, Richard Brown (Λ), Joseph Bush, Samuel W Christophers, Samuel Coley, Dr. William Davies, John D. Geden, Frederic Greeves, John Hartley, John Harvard, Joseph Heaton, Benjamin Hellier, Henry W Holland, Dr. Lyth, James A. Macdonald, Joshua Mason, Alexander M'Aulay, Thomas M'Cullagh, William B. Pope, Frederick E. Toyne, and John Walton.

(5.) In order to give timely notice of the issue of the New Hymn-Book, and to afford opportunity to arrange more conveniently for it, either the old or the New Hymn-Book may be used in public worship among us until January 1st, 1876, by which date it is hoped that the New Hymn-Book may be in general use in our congregations.

(6.) To facilitate the introduction of the New Hymn-Book in our congregations, the Conference directs that the New Supplement shall be sold separately at first.

(7) The Conference presents its special thanks to the REV. DR. JOBSON for his management of the affairs of the Book-Room, which has been marked by distinguished fidelity, prudence, and ability, as well as by great zeal and energy.

(8.) The Conference directs the London Book-Committee to consider during the year, and report to the next Conference, as to whether it is not desirable to *reduce* the number of members of the Book-Committee, and in what manner it may be best effected.

2. The London Book-Committee shall consist of the PEE-SIDENT and the SECHETARY of the Conference, the Ex-Presidents, the Editors, the Secretary of the Book-Committee, the Missionary Secretaries, the Principals of the two Branches of the Normal Training Institution, the Governor and the Tutors of the Richmond Branch of the Theological Institution, the Rev. Dr. Moulton, the Secretary for Home Missions, the Secretary of the Education Committee, the Visitor of Day and Sunday Schools, the Principal of the Children's Home, the Rev. G. Stringer Rowe, the Superintendents of the London Circuits, and the following additional members chosen from Ministers in London and the Metropolitan District; namely, Rev. Messrs. Thomas Akroyd, John Baker, M.A., William Gibson, B.A., Mark G. Pearse, Luke Tyerman, Henry W Williams, and Robert N. Young.

Q. XV What are the Resolutions of the Conference with regard to CHAPEL AFFAIRS ?

A. 1. The Conference cordially adopts the Resolutions of the Committee of Review, held in Camborne, on Monday, July 27th. 1874; and directs that those Resolutions, and an Abstract of the Report then read, be printed in the Minutes. (See Appendix, No. IV., 1874.)

2. The Conference authorizes the President, during the year, to affix his signature to any consent to the sale of Trust Property which may be certified to him as approved by the Chapel Committee.

3. The Conference receives with satisfaction the returns of accommodation provided in Wesleyan-Methodist Places of Worship, which have been obtained and tabulated under the direction of the General Chapel Committee, and requests that the results be published in the Annual Report of that Committee, and in any other form that may appear desirable.

4. The Conference directs that if, in any case to which a Connexional Committee has paid a Grant or Loan towards the cost of erecting a Chapel on condition that no debt shall be left except a Loan or Loans repayable without interest, any other debt be contracted without the sanction of the Committee advancing the Loan, and of the General Chapel Committee, the particulars of such debt and the circumstances which occasioned it, shall be reported to the ensuing Annual Meeting of the District in which such Chapel is situated, and a record of the action taken thereon by the said District Meeting shall be presented to the ensuing Conference.

5. MR. SAMUEL R. HEALEY, of Liverpool, and MR. RICHARD HAWORTH, of Manchester, are re-appointed the Treasurers of the General Chapel Fund.

6. The REV. WILLIAM EDWARDS and the REV. EDWIN H. TINDALL are re-appointed the General Secretaries of the Chapel Committee.

HOME-MISSION AND CONTINGENT FUND.

Q. XVII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference in reference to the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund?

A. 1. The Conference receives and adopts the Report of the Committee of Management, and of the Army and Navy Committee, and directs that the Resolutions passed by the General Committee, and the Returns from the Army and Reserve forces, be printed in the Minutes. (See Appendixes, Nos. VI. and XI., 1874.)

2. The Conference is thankful to Almighty God for the continued success of our Home-Mission work, and for the results of our ministrations to Wesleyans in the Army and the Royal Navy; and is gratified to find that in many of the claimant Circuits the allowances to our Ministers have been improved, though in many others they are still insufficient. It views with much encouragement the steady increase of the annual income of the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund, and it trusts that more extended practical sympathy will be manifested with this important and necessary work.

3. That, recognising the importance of the resolutions adopted by the Special Committee of Management, as contained in the Home-Mission Report, and the need of greater exertions in behalf of our Home-Mission work, the Conference, in addition to its repeated and urgent recommendations, now directs the Superintendents of Circuits to take care that as many public Home-Missionary Meetings be held annually in our Chapels as may be possible, and that every effort be made that these Meetings be efficiently arranged and conducted.

4. The Conference instructs the Financial District Meetings to arrange, with all possible care, for the due holding of Home-Missionary Meetings in the several Circuits; to do everything in their power to encourage the formation of Juvenile Home and Foreign Missionary Associations; and to promote a more general canvass for subscriptions to the annual income of the Fund.

5. The Conference recommends that in every Circuit a Home-Missionary Committee and a Secretary be appointed to promote in detail systematic efforts to increase the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund.

6. JUVENILE HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONARY ASSOCIATIONS. —The Conference is glad to know that there has been a gratifying increase in the number of Juvenile Home and Foreign Missionary Associations during the year, and it entertains the hope that these useful Associations—aiding at once our Home and Foreign Missions—will be established in all our Circuits.

The Conference is decidedly of opinion, that wherever sums, large or small, are collected avowedly for the Foreign or Home Missions, the whole amount should be remitted to the Treasurers of these Funds respectively, to be administered under the direction of their Committees; and that sums so remitted to the Home-Mission Fund should entitle a Circuit to favourable consideration, if it request a grant for any effort within its boundaries which may be a legitimate object for the application of moneys collected for Home-Missions. (*Minutes*, 1863.)

On this subject the following modification has been made :--In the case of Circuits which are not in a position to ask for the appointment of a Home-Missionary Minister, and to give the pledge required, but which feel the necessity of adopting some plan of *Home-Missionary operations*, the subjoined allocation shall be allowed :--

One-third of the sums received by Juvenile Home and Foreign Missionary Associations, to be paid to the Funds of the Foreign Missionary Society, "it being expressly understood that in every case the contribution to the Foreign Missions shall be at least equal to what has been presented from Christmas Offerings, on the average of several preceding years :"

One-third to the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund :

One-third to the Circuit, to be expended in support of local movements of a *directly Home-Missionary character*, under the direction of the Superintendent, and of a Committee to be appointed at the December Quarterly Meeting.

In all other cases the former Minute of the Conference remains in force.

7 The Conference decuns it expedient to reprint the following Rule from the Minutes of 1797 : -

"That all bills for the support of travelling preachers and their families, in respect to deficiencies, house-rent, fire, candles. sickness, travelling expenses and all other matters of a temporal kind for their support, for which the Circuits cannot provide, shall first meet with the approbation of the Quarterly Meeting, and be signed by the General Steward of the Circuit, before they can be brought to the District Committee."

8. Home-Mission Regulations. — Each Home-Missionary Minister is directed, with the concurrence of the Superintendent

Minister, to forward with his Journal, signed as now by the Superintendent, to the General Secretary for the information of the Committee, a copy of the Circuit-Plan; and a quarterly statement of the number of full and accredited Church-members, and of persons on trial, in connection with the place or places specially assigned to him as his Mission-District.

9. MR. JOHN VANNER and the REV. JOHN W GREEVES are re-appointed the Treasurers; the REV. CHARLES PREST, the General Secretary; and the REV. JOHN BOND, Secretary. The Committee, which shall meet before the next Conference, shall consist of the Committee of Management, and the

8. The Conference refers back the various matters mentioned in the Minutes of the General Committee, and in the Resolutions of the Committee of Review, to the General Committee, with the request that they will take them into careful consideration, and report thereon to the next Conference.

EXAMINATION OF CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY.

Q. XX. What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the EXAMINATION OF CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY?

A. 1. The Conference resolves that the Special Examination

of Candidates for the Ministry shall in future be conducted by a Committee in two Sections, having charge of Examinations to be held simultaneously at Richmond and Didsbury respectively.

2. That the two Sections of this Committee be constituted as follows :---

(1.) THE SOUTHERN SECTION, to meet at Richmond, shall consist of the President and the Secretary of the Conference, the Ex-Presidents resident in London, the Secretaries of the Wesleyan-Methodist Missionary Society (one excepted), the Tutors and Governor of the Richmond Branch of the Theological Institution, the General Secretary of the Theological Institution, the General Secretary of the Theological Institution, the General Secretary of the Richmond Branch; the Connexional Editors; the Secretary of the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund; one of the General Secretaries of the Examination Committee; the Revs. Dr. Rigg, Dr. Moulton, and Jacob Stephenson, B.A.; together with twelve other Ministers of the two London Districts, six of whom shall be annually elected by the District Committee of each of the said Districts in May

(2.) THE NORTHERN SECTION, to meet at Didsbury, shall consist of the Ex-President of the Conference; the Ex-Presidents living in the Manchester and adjoining Districts; one of the Secretaries of the Missionary Society; the Tutors and Governors of the Didsbury and Headingley Branches of the Theological Institution; the Local Secretary of the Didsbury Branch : one of the General Secretaries of the Examination Committee : the Rev. John S. Banks; together with twenty Ministers of the Liverpool and Manchester Districts, ten of whom shall be annually elected by the District Committee of each of the said Districts in May.

3. That Candidates from the Liverpool and Manchester Districts shall be summoned to the Southern Examination, and Candidates from the First and Second London Districts to the Northern Examination: all other Candidates shall be summoned at the discretion of the General Examination Secretaries, with due regard to the cost of travelling.

4. That two Sub-Committees, to read and report on the manuscript sermons of the Candidates, shall be annually appointed as follows :—one for the Southern Section, consisting of six Ministers, three of whom shall be chosen by the District Committee of each of the two London Districts from among the Ministers elected by it as members of the Examination Committee; and another for the Northern Section, consisting of six Ministers, three of whom shall be chosen by the District Committees of the Liverpool and the Manchester Districts respectively, from among the Ministers elected by them as members of the Examination Committee.

5. That the Literary Examination Paper for the Examination be prepared in succession by the Classical and Mathematical Tutors of each of the three Branches of the Theological Institution; and that the Theological Paper for the Examination be prepared in succession by each of the three Theological Tutors of the said three Branches.

6. That the Classical and Mathematical Tutors of the Richmond Branch be the Literary Examiners for the Southern Section of the Committee; and that the Classical and Mathematical Tutors of the Didsbury and Headingley Branches be the Literary Examiners for the Northern Section of the Committee.

7. That the Examiners of the Papers in Theology written by the Candidates shall be appointed as follows :—each of the beforenamed Districts shall appoint one Examiner from among the Ministers elected by it as Members of the Examination Committee; thus providing two Examiners for each of its two Sections.

8. The Rev. John Clulow and the General Secretary of the Theological Institution are appointed General Secretaries of the Examination Committee for this year.

9. The Local Secretary of the Richmond Branch of the Theological Institution, and the Rev. Jacob Stephenson, B.A., are appointed to act as Examination Secretaries for the Southern Section; and the Local Secretary of the Didsbury Branch, and the Rev. John S. Banks, to act as Examination Secretaries for the Northern Section.

10. The Conference repeats its direction of last year, that arrangements shall be made by the May District Meetings for the hearing of each Candidate by one Minister of the District, in addition to those who have heard him before his recommendation by the District Committee, such Minister to forward his Report to the General Secretaries of the Examination Committee.

EDUCATION.

Q. XXI. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of WESLEYAN EDUCATION ?

A. 1. The Conference adopts the Report and Resolutions of the Education Committee of Review, held in Camborne, on Friday, July 24th, 1874; and directs that they be printed in the Minutes. (See Appendix, No. X., 1874.)

2. With a view to the completion of the educational arrangements of Methodism in conformity with the first Resolution of the Committee of Review, by the provision in various parts of the country, and under Methodist management, of Schools for boys and girls of the Middle Classes, so organized as to furnish suitable instruction by the best methods and on moderate terms; the Conference instructs the Education Committee to consider whether such Schools can be provided, and to report the result of their deliberations to the next Conference.

3. The Conference receives the Report of the Special Meeting of Ministers and laymen, held on April 14th and 15th, 1874, in accordance with a Resolution of the last Conference, to consider the Scheme for the formation of a Connexional Sunday-School Union. The Conference also receives various Resolutions relating to the said Union, which are submitted by the Education Committee; and agrees to the formation of a Connexional Sunday-School Union, which shall be under the general management of the Education Committee, in such manuer as it may determine, in harmony with the following plan, viz. :--

(1.) That the Objects of the Connexional Sunday-School Union shall be as follows :---

1. To promote the development of the Sunday-School system, with the special design of securing greater spiritual results, and the gathering of Sunday scholars into the Wesleyan-Methodist Society

11. To promote a closer sympathy and relationship between the School, the Society, and the Ministry

III. To promote union and co-operation among Wesleyan-Methodist Sunday-Schools in the several Circuits, and to encourage the Connexional element in the character and working of such Schools.

iv. To promote the establishment of Wesleyan-Methodist Sunday-Schools, and the formation of Circuit Unions, wherever practicable.

v. To supply Teachers with such aid and information as shall tend to the more efficient instruction of their classes.

vi. To collect and give information respecting the best methods for the organization and management of Wesleyan-Methodist Sunday-Schools.

vII. To obtain, record, and supply statistical details as to the condition of our Sunday-Schools.

VIII. To render aid in the supply of suitable School-books and appliances, and of books for rewards and libraries.

IX. To promote such other purposes as experience and observation may, in the future, suggest for the benefit of the Sunday-Schools of the Connexion.

(2.) That it is desirable to establish in connection with the Union, as soon as convenient, a Connexional Central Agency, provided with sale and show-rooms, library, reading-room, and other appliances, in some suitable locality in or near the City, besides a warehousing and wholesale department at the Book-Room.

(3.) That it is also desirable to establish, as may be found practicable, (i) Sub-Centres of the Union in Metropolitan districts, which may include provision for Teachers' reading-rooms and libraries, and model-lessons : and (ii) Provincial Centres, which may include Teachers' reading-rooms and libraries, provision for model-lessons, and depots for the sale of Sunday-School publications. 1874.

(4.) That the Union shall be empowered to make grants in aid of the outfit of such Sub-Centres and Provincial Centres.

(5.) That the Union shall direct special attention to the preparation and provision of Sunday-School Lesson-Books, and general Sunday-School literature, periodical and otherwise.

(6.) That the Union shall supply books, stationery, and apparatus suited to Sunday-Schools, at reduced prices.

(7.) That the publications of the Connexional Sunday-School Union shall be under the direction of a Sub-Committee of the Education Committee, in the constitution of which Sub-Committee the Book-Steward and the Connexional Editors shall be included as ex officio members, together with certain selected members of the Book Committee; also, that in conjunction with the Secretary of the Education Committee, or any Minister who may be appointed by the Conference to act as the Secretary to the Sunday-School Union, the Connexional Editors shall be responsible to the Conference for the publications of the Union, and shall be regarded as representing this department in the Book Committee.

(8.) The Conference approves the following arrangements, which have been agreed upon between the Education Committee and the Book Committee : viz.,—

That inasmuch as the proportion of new business which the Connexional Sunday-School Union will bring to the Book-Room cannot be ascertained at present, it is inexpedient to conclude a permanent agreement between the Union and the Book Committee; but that until the Conference of 1876 the Connexional Sunday-School Union shall be entitled upon all sales at its Central Depôt, both of such books as are the property of the Book-Room, and of all other books, to discounts agreed upon; together with a contribution, at a prescribed rate, upon the annual amount of Book-Room sales of Sunday-School publications and supplies of books to Sunday-Schools, so far as that amount shall exceed that of such sales and supplies for the year ending Midsummer, 1873.

(9.) The Conference resolves that admission to the advantages of the Union shall be by subscription; (1) On the part of separate Schools, of a minimum payment of five shillings; (2) On the part of Circuit Unions for connected Schools, of a minimum average payment of four shillings per School per annum in Unions containing not less than five such Schools. Schools subscribing, either separately or through their Circuit Unions, shall be entitled to library grants, and such other advantages as the Union can afford.

(10.) The Conference empowers the Connexional Sunday-School Union to promote the occasional holding of meetings for conference on Sunday-School topics in convenient centres. (11.) The Conference adopts the following proposals which have been submitted to it by the Education Committee :---

i. That the Rev John Clulow be appointed to act under the direction of the Education Committee in the visitation of Day and Sunday Schools, and as the Secretary of the Counexional Sunday-School Union.

ii. That the Education Committee shall appoint a lay Assistant-Secretary, to act under the direction of the Secretary in the work of the Union, whose duties shall include sub-editorial work, attention to Union finance, Sunday-School statistics, correspondence, and oversight of the Central Agency

(12.) The Conference sanctions an application to the Connexion for the funds required to defray the initial expenses of the Union, including the outfit of the Central Agency; and anticipates that the subsequent annual cost of such an agency, and the annual expenditure of the Union, will be provided for by a Fund to be derived from the following sources: (1) Subscriptions of School Committees, Sunday-School Unions, and of private friends: (2, an annual grant from the General Education Fund; (3) any profits which may accrue from the sales of the Central Agency; and (4) payments from the Book Committee in accordance with the arrangements between it and the Education Committee already adopted by the Conference.

(13.) The Conference directs that a separate account of income and expenditure on behalf of the Connexional Sunday-School Union shall be kept, and annually published by the Education Committee.

4. The Conference commends the Connexional Sunday-School Union to the hearty sympathy of the Ministers and of the Connexion at large, and trusts that such co-operation and financial support will be afforded to this undertaking as will contribute to render it of much advantage to the Sunday-School work of the Connexion.

5. The Conference directs that the Statistics of the Day and Sunday Schools of each Circuit be read in the March Quarterly Meeting, but that if sufficient time be not then available for the discussion of the Statistics and for inquiry into the state of the Schools, such discussion and inquiry shall take place in the June Quarterly Meeting.

6. The Conference directs that the Education Schedules, having been duly filled up and presented to the March Quarterly Meeting, shall be sent by the Superintendents to the Education Secretary of the District, not later than April 10th.

7 The Conference directs all who are contemplating the erection or alteration of premises, for the establishment of new Schools, to communicate with the Education Committee, for the purpose of receiving counsel as to their projected undertakings, and the adaptation of the premises to the system of instruction designed to be adopted.

8. (1.) In view of the interpretation which is put upon Section xxIII. of the Elementary Education Act of 1870 by the Lords of the Committee of Council, to the effect that any transfer of a School, settled upon our School Model Deed No. I., to a School Board, for any term whatever, for the purposes of such School Board, must be sanctioned not only by the signatures of the Trustees, but by the Conference, testified by the President in writing; the Conference directs that in every ease in which the transfer of such a School is proposed, the Superintendent, with the Managers and Trustees acting in concert, shall first eonsult the Education Committee on the subject, and that if, for reasons given, that Committee recommends such a transfer, the rules of the Conference in relation to the sale of Trust Property shall be applicable thereto :-- the Education Committee considering all questions affecting School management, and the Chapel Committee questions affecting Trust Property.—(2.) In respect to Schools settled on the School Model Deed No. II., or on any other Deed in which the consent of the Conference is rendered necessary for the alienation of the property, the Conference recommends the Trustees to act upon the same principles as those laid down in the foregoing elause in relation to Schools settled on the School Model Deed No. I.-(3.) In all cases of transfer which may hereafter occur, the Conference recommends that provision be made in the instrument of transfer to secure the resumption of the premises by the Trustees without their being required to reimburse any money laid out by the School Board solely for its own purposes.

9. The REV. DR. RIGG is re-appointed Principal of the Training College, Westminster.

10. The REV. THEOPHILUS WOOLMER and Mr. ISAAC HOYLE are re-appointed the Treasurers; and the REV. GEORGE O. BATE is re-appointed the Secretary.

The Conference resolves that the following addition shall be made to question XLL in the Order and Form of Business in District Meetings :—" Has any Wesleyan Day-School been discontinued, or transferred to other Management, since the last May District Meeting ; and if so, have the directions of the Conference relating thereto been observed ?" 13. The Education Committee of Review shall meet in Sheffield, on the Friday preceding the next Conference, and, in addition to the Committee above named, shall consist of so many of the District Education Secretaries as shall have permission to attend the ensuing Conference; thirty Ministers and thirty Laymen from the Sheffield, Manchester, Halifax and Bradford, Leeds, Nottingham and Derby, Lincoln, Hull, and York Districts, to be selected by the Education Committee; together with those Gentlemen who may be chosen by the lay members of the District Committees at the May District Meetings in Great Britain, to attend the Annual Meeting of the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund Committee, preparatory to the Conference.

14. The Conference resolves that No. V of the General Rules of Sunday-Schools, printed in the Minutes of Conference, 1873, be re-worded as follows :—

"The Superintendent Minister of the Circuit shall preside in the Annual Meeting (Rule IV.); also in all meetings of the Committee, and in all meetings of the Teachers. If at any one of the said meetings the Superintendent Minister be not present, one of the other Ministers of the Circuit shall preside. If, either at an Annual Meeting or at a Meeting of the Committee, no Minister is present, the meeting shall appoint one of the officers of the Institution to act as its Chairman. If at any Teachers' meeting no Minister is present, one of the Superintendents of the School shall preside."

HIGHER EDUCATION.

Q. XXII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on receiving the Report of the Committee on HIGHER EDUCATION ?

A. 1. The Conference appoints the following Ministers and Gentlemen a Committee to earry out the suggestions on the improvement of Wesleyan-Methodist Trust-Property in Oxford, which were adopted by the Conference of 1873, (See Minutes, pp. 184, 269, of this Volume,) viz.,—the President and the Seeretary of the Conference, the Ex-President, the Rev. William Arthur, M.A., Benjamin Frankland, B.A., Frederie Greeves, John W Greeves, John Hearnshaw, Dr. James, Ebenezer E. Jenkins, M.A., Dr. Moulton, George W Olver, B.A., Dr. Rigg, William F. Slater, Dr. Stamp, T. Bowman Stephenson, B.A., and Robert N. Young; with Messrs. J. S. Budgett, T. P Bunting, J. C. Clark, M.P., William Edmunds, Henry Freneh, B.A., Thomas Hazlehurst, Elkanah Healey, Isaac Hoyle, Sir Francis Lycett, Alexander M'Arthur, M.P., W M'Arthur, M.P., J. H. Mason, William Mewburn, J. Ryder, J. R. Symm, J. Vanner, and C. Vinter.

The REV. G. W. OLVER, B.A., is appointed the Secretary of this Committee.

2. The Conference gives permission to this Committee to contemplate the erection of a New Chapel in Oxford, should the Committee be convinced that such erection is desirable; and authorizes the REV. DE. STAMP and the REV. FREDERIC GREEVES to solicit contributions for the purpose of the improvements that may be resolved upon.

3. The Conference refers to the same Committee the consideration of the statements and proposals relating to the Cambridge Circuit, which have been laid before the Committee on Higher Education.

4. The Conference hereby requests the President to give notice in writing, under his hand, to the Trustees appointed by the Deed of August 30th, 1872, or to some two of them, that the Conference directs such Trustees, on payment to them of the moneys specified by such Deed, to convey the Property vested in them by such Deed to such persons and upon such Trusts as are hereinafter named.

5. The Conference directs that the first Governing Body of the intended School shall consist of the persons named in the 10th article of the Report of the Special Committee on Higher Education, presented to, and generally approved by, the Conference of 1873: and authorizes and directs the Rev. W ARTHUR, M.A., and the REV GEORGE W OLVER, B.A., to take measures for the immediate constitution of such Governing Bedy.

6. The persons to whom the Property shall be conveyed, as the Trustees thereof, shall be twenty in number, and shall be such persons, whether or not members of the Governing Body, as shall be elected at the first meeting of the Governing Body by a majority of the Governörs present, and shall subsequently be approved by the President, Secretary, and Ex-President of the Conference, or the majority of them. Ten of such Trustees shall be in full connexion with the Conference, and ten shall be Laymen.

7. The Property shall be held on such Trusts as shall be consistent with the General Trusts declared by the said Deed of August 30th, 1872, and as shall be determined on by the Governing Body or a majority of them, and as shall subsequently be approved in the manner before mentioned. The Trusts deelared by the Deed of 30th August, 1872, are "any Trusts for Educational or other purposes, all such Trusts to be connected with and under the direction of the said Conference and for their own Connexional purposes only, and no other.")

8. Subject to the preceding Resolutions, the Conference consents to such modifications of the General Plan of the proposed School submitted to and generally approved by it in 1873 being incorporated in the Tru t Deed, as shall be adopted by the Governing Body, and as shall subsequently be so approved as before mentioned. 1874.

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9. For the purposes of these Resolutions, the Governing Body shall be considered as complete before it shall be fully constituted by the election of one member of it by the Resident Masters of the School.

10. The Conference appoints the REV. DR. MOULTON, for this year, to promote the objects of the scheme for Higher Education at Cambridge.

THE CHILDREN'S HOME.

Q. XXIII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of the CHILDREN'S HOME ?

A. 1. The Conference receives the Report of the Children's Home, and expresses its thankfulness for the success which has attended the operations of this Institution. It approves the proposed establishment of a certified Industrial School as a Branch of the Home, and commends this growing work to the increased liberality and earnest prayers of the Christian public.

2. The Conference is gratified to hear that premises have been secured in London, which, with the proposed alterations and additions, will provide the accommodation needed for the chief office of the Institution, as well as for the London Branch; and expresses its earnest hope that the Special Fund of $\pm 10,000$ required to complete this provision, will be speedily raised by those who feel the claims of orphan and destitute children.

3. The Conference directs that this property shall be settled upon the same trusts as those declared with respect to the property belonging to the Children's Home at Edgworth, and appoints as Trustees the Ministers and Gentlemen whose names have been submitted to it.

RELIGIOUS OBSERVANCE OF THE LORD'S DAY.

Q. XXIV What are the Resolutions of the Conference on receiving the Report of the LORD'S-DAY COMMITTEE ?

A. 1. The Conference has received with interest the Report of this Committee, and approves of its action in resisting the proposal to open, by legislative enactment, Public Museums, Libraries, and kindred institutions on Sundays : it further records its satisfaction that the Connexion has so generally responded to the call to petition Parliament for the entire closing of publichouses on the Lord's Day, and earnestly trusts that our people will continue to use every effort within their power to suppress that most demoralizing form of Sabbath desceration, the traffic in intoxicating drinks.

2. The Conference, deeply impressed with the fact that the profanation of the Lord's Day is a great and grievous evil in the country, again earnestly recommends our Societies and congregations to maintain the utmost fidelity to its requirements, and by conscientious abstinence from secular engagements and unnecessary travelling, and by a eareful attention to religious duties, to seek to obtain for themselves, and to extend to others, the blessings which this Divine institution is designed to secure.

3. The thanks of the Conference are presented to the Rev. GEORGE MAUNDER and the REV. JOHN BAKER, M.A., for their services during the past year, and they are re-appointed the Secretaries of the Lord's Day Committee for the ensuing year.

EXAMINATION OF PREACHERS ON TRIAL.

Q. XXV What directions does the Conference give concerning the Examination of PREACHERS ON TRIAL ?

A. 1. The Conference resolves :---

(1.) That the Examination of Preachers on Trial shall be conducted by a Connexional Board of Examiners, to consist of one Examiner in each subject contained in the course of reading prescribed for the four years of probation.

(2.) That in addition to the Probationers' Examination Committee, two General Examination Secretaries be appointed from among Ministers stationed in the same town.

(3.) That arrangements be made, at each Financial District Meeting, for a Central Examination of Preachers on Trial in each District, or more than one if necessary; at which Central Examination or Examinations the Probationers in that District shall attend. In the event of any Preacher on Trial being unable to pay the necessary travelling expenses, they shall be defrayed either from the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund, or from the Theological Institution Fund, as the Committees of those Funds may decide.

(4.) That at each Financial District Meeting a District Probationers' Examination Secretary be appointed, or more than one, so as to provide a Secretary to take charge of each Central Examination in the District; and that the District Secretary be held responsible for the efficient conduct of the Central Examination. Full and clear instructions as to the course to be pursued are to be forwarded to the District Secretaries by the General Secretaries.

(5.) That the Examination take place throughout the Connexion on the same day in the first week of April.

(6.) That the Examination-Papers, prepared under the direction of the Committee, shall be sent by the General Secretaries to each District Examination Secretary, whose duty it shall be to distribute them at the Central Examination, and by the earliest post transmit to the General Secretaries the Papers written by the several Probationers at those Examinations.

(7.) That the Probationers' Papers be forwarded by the General Secretaries to the Examiners for valuation, and that each Examiner send to them the results of his valuation of the Papers shown by numbers together with any remarks upon them which he may think desirable.

(8.) That the General Secretaries compile from the returns of the Examiners a complete Report upon the reading of each Probationer, and forward it to the District Examination Secretary, to be presented by him to the May District Meeting, together with such remarks on the Examination of the Preachers on Trial in the District as he may think desirable.

(9.) That the General Secretaries prepare and present to the Conference a General Report upon the Examination of the Preachers on Trial.

ARRANGEMENTS RESPECTING THE STATIONING COMMITTEE.

The Conference resolves that, in future, the Representative of each District shall send to the Secretary of the Conference, not later than the 5th day of July in each year, upon a Schedule to be provided by him, complete lists of (1) the arrangements provisionally made for the Stationing of Ministers in his District, (2) the invitations accepted by Ministers in his District for whom no arrangement has been made ;—that from these lists the Secretary of the Conference shall compile, and cause to be printed in a convenient form for use in the Stationing Committee, one complete list of all arrangements thus provisionally made, and a separate list of all Ministers for whom provisionally arrangements have not been made ; and that a copy of these lists shall be sent to each member of the Stationing Committee at least seven days before the meeting of that Committee.

RE-ARRANGEMENT OF DISTRICTS.

The Conference is deeply sensible of the value of the labour bestowed on this subject by the Committee to which it was specially entrusted, by the several District Meetings in Great Britain, and by the large Committee which met previously to the assembling of the Conference; but regards the practical difficulties connected with it as so great as to render it expedient to defer the consideration of the scheme submitted to it until next year. The Conference further devolves on its President the duty of bringing this subject under the attention of the next Conference.

CONSTITUTION OF A LEADERS' MEETING.

The Conference adopts the following definition of the constitution of a Leaders' Meeting ; viz., that it shall consist of—

(1.) The Ministers and Preachers on Trial who are appointed to the work of the Circuit.

(2.) The Leaders of the Society, the Society Stewards, the Stewards of the Poor Fund, and any Circuit Steward or Stewards who may be members of that Society.

(3.) In future, when a Secretary is appointed in any Leaders' Meeting, such Secretary must be chosen from among the members of that Meeting.

BOUNDARIES OF CIRCUITS.

Whereas difficulties have arisen from the want of accurate and recorded definitions of the Boundaries of Circuits, the Conference directs that, in future, the Boundaries of Circuits which are divided shall be fully stated in the Minutes of the District Meeting to which they belong, and that the Secretary of the District shall send a copy of the record to be inserted in the Minutes of the Quarterly Meetings of the Circuits concerned : and that in such cases copies of the Ordnance maps, or some other maps, of the localities concerned, be coloured so as to show the boundaries, and deposited in the safes provided for the custody of the Trust-Deeds of the Circuits. The Conference further directs that these arrangements be made in all cases of alteration in the boundaries of existing Circuits.

PASTORAL OVERSIGHT OF THE YOUNG.

The Conference remits this subject to the following Committee, viz.: The President and the Secretary of the Conference, the Ex-Presidents, the Revs. Thomas Akroyd, Joseph Bush, John Clulow, Benjamin Frankland, B.A., Frederic Greeves, John W. Greeves, J. Riehard Hargreaves, Henry W. Holland, Edward Lightwood, Alexander M'Aulay, Joshua Mason, Marmaduke C. Osborn, Marshall Randles, Dr. Rigg, Edward J. Robinson, S. Evans Rowe, George Scott (B), J. V B. Shrewsbury, William O. Simpson, J. Smith Speneer, Robert Stephenson, B.A., Samuel H. Tindall, Frederick E. Toyne, Henry W Williams, Samuel Wray, Robert N. Young; with George O. Bate and George Bowden, Conveners.

THE STATUS OF COMMUNICANTS.

The Conference resolves that the recommendations on this subject, which have been made to it by the Committee appointed to consider it during the past year, shall be brought before the Ministers in the Annual District Meetings in May; and that their suggestions thereon shall be forwarded to the Committee above appointed on the Pastoral Oversight of the Young, who shall report to the next Conference.

LOCAL PREACHERS.

The Conference adopts the following recommendations of the Committee appointed to consider the means of assisting Local Preachers in preparation for their important work :----

1. That it is desirable and necessary, considering the exigeneies of our work, and the fact that our supply of Ministers is drawn from our Local Preachers, that steps should be taken to secure in every Circuit an ample and efficient supply of this most useful elass of labourers; and that Superintendents should direct their special attention to eligible and promising young men in their respective Circuits, with a view to their becoming Local Preachers, and, as far as practicable, should direct their reading and studies to that end.

2. That before any Candidate comes upon the Plan on trial, the Superintendent shall eertify that he has passed a satisfactory examination in the Second Cateehism with the Appendix, and in the Elements of English Grammar.

The Conference appoints the following Ministers and Gentlemen a Committee for the further consideration of this subject, viz.: The President and the Secretary of the Conference, the Ex-President, the Revs. W Arthur, M.A., John Bond, George Bowden, Dr. James, Dr. Jobson, Dr. Osborn, Charles Prest, Henry W Williams, and John Walton; together with Messrs. Abraham J. Brook, Samuel Budgett, John Dyson, W. Gray, J. B. Ingle, George Lidgett, B.A., Thomas Pethick, William W Pocock, B.A., William H. Stephenson, William Sugden, B.A., Enoch Torbet, Samuel D. Waddy, M.P., William H. Walmsley, John W Wayman, and Thomas Wilshaw.

AUXILIARY HOME-MISSION WORK IN THE METROPOLIS.

The Conference receives the Report, and sanctions the Rules of the Metropolitan Methodist Lay Mission as now revised, and repeats the expression of its entire approval of this effort to take the Gospel to the spiritually destitute in the Metropolis, who are inaccessible to the ordinary agencies of the Church.

The Conference further directs that a Report of this Mission shall be laid before the two London District Meetings in May

POSITION OF MINISTERS APPOINTED TO THE ARMY AND ROYAL NAVY, AND THEIR RELATION TO THE SUPERINTENDENTS OF CHRCUITS.

The Conference resolves that the Ministers who are appointed to labour in the Army and Royal Navy are not to be considered as Ministers of the Circuit where they may be stationed, so as to be claimed for Circuit work, unless special arrangements be made, in any case, with the Army Committee and with the Conference. After their proper work has been efficiently done, they may, by matual arrangement, give such help to the Circuit as they may be enabled to do, and as they have invariably done in times past. Their personal conduct is to be under the cognizance of the Superintendent of the Circuit and the District Meeting, with the before-mentioned conditions.

REVISION OF THE LITURGY AND THE BOOK OF OFFICES.

The Conference appoints the following Ministers a Committee to consider the subject of Revising the Liturgy and the Book of Offices, especially with a view to the removal of all expressions which are fairly susceptible of a sense contrary to the principles of our Evangelical Protestantism, and to report to the next Conference; viz., The President and the Secretary of the Conference, the Ex-Presidents, the Revs. Samuel Coley, Benjamin Frankland, B.A., J. Richard Hargreaves, Henry W. Holland, Ebenezer E. Jenkins, M.A., Dr. Moulton, William B. Pope, William T. Radcliffe, Dr. Rigg, Henry W. Williams, and Benjamin Gregory, Convener.

LAWS AFFECTING MARRIAGE.

The Conference repeats the sentiments which it has affirmed respecting the importance of a complete and uniform National Registration of marriages, and of such an amendment of the laws relating thereto as would secure perfect religious equality for all denominations as to the legal conditions on which marriages shall be solemnized and recorded. The Conference again commends this subject to the attention of the Committee of Exigency.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES ACTS.

The Conference hears with much satisfaction that a Society has been formed with a view to diffuse information, and to call forth the combined efforts of our people in opposition to these Acts, in harmony with any measures which may be taken by the Committee of Exigency in relation to the subject; and it commends this Society to the support of our friends throughout the country

The Conference repeats the expression of its utter disapproval of these Acts, as iniquitous in principle, and demoralizing in their tendency, and its determination to use all legitimate means to seek their repeal.

MISCELLANEOUS RESOLUTIONS.

1. Thanks to the retiring President.—Resolved unanimously, That the respectful and affectionate thanks of the Conference are due, and are hereby presented, to its late President, the REV. GEORGE T. PERKS, M.A., for his eminently faithful, judicious, and efficient discharge of his official duties, both during the Session of the last Conference and throughout the year.

2. Thanks to the Secretary.—Resolved unanimously, That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the REV GERVASE SMITH, M.A., for his able and acceptable services as the Secretary of the Conference.

3. The Ex-President's Sermon.—Resolved unanimously, That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the Ex-President, the REV. GEORGE T. PERKS, M.A., for the instructive, powerful, and seasonable Discourse delivered by him on Sunday morning, August 2nd; and that he be requested to publish it.

4. The President's Sermon.—Resolved unanimously, That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the President, the Rev. W. MORLEY PUNSHON, LL.D., for the cloquent, practical, and impressive Sermon preached by him on Sunday evening, August 2nd; and that he be requested to publish it.

5. The Ex-President's Charge.—Resolved unanimously, That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the Ex-President, the REV. GEORGE T. PERKS, M.A., for the lucid, comprehensive, and powerful Charge delivered by him to one division of the newly-ordained Ministers; and that he be earnestly requested to publish it.

6. The Rev. Luke H. Wiseman's Charge.-Resolved unanimously, That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the REV. LUKE II. WISEMAN, M.A., for the able, instructive, and faithful Charge delivered by him to the second division of the newly-ordained Ministers; and that he be earnestly requested to publish it.

7 The Rev. John Dury Geden's Fernley Lecture.—Resolved unanimously, That the cordial and respectful thanks of the Conference be given to the REV. JOHN DURY GEDEN for the able, learned, and seasonable Discourse delivered by him at the Fernley Lecture, on Tuesday evening, July 28th.

8. Suggestions from District Meetings.—It is resolved, That the Convener of the Conference Committee on Memorials from Circuits and Suggestions from District Meetings, is authorized to obtain, immediately after the Annual District Meetings, from the Sceretaries of the District Committees, copies of any Suggestions which may have been made, and that nothing shall be deemed to be a Suggestion of a District Meeting but what is recorded in answer to the Question on the subject in the District Minutes.

The REV FRANCIS W GREEVES is re-appointed the Convener of the Committee referred to.

9. It is resolved that the Annual Meetings of the several District Committees shall be held between the 9th and the 16th of May, 1875, with the exception of the Lincoln, Hull, North Wales, South Wales, Isle of Man, and Zetland Districts.

STANDING ORDERS.

1. Home-Missionary Ministers. — (1.) At each Financial District Meeting a return shall be made, from each Circuit in which a Home-Missionary Minister is stationed, of the sum contributed by the Circuit to the Home-Mission Fund, and of the cost of such appointment to the Home-Mission Committee; according to the "Regulations for the employment of Home-Missionary Ministers" adopted by the Conference of 1859.

(2.) The Conference directs that a special inquiry shall be made at the May District Meeting, whether the Regulations for the employment of Home-Missionary Ministers, adopted by the Conference, have been faithfully observed in the Circuits to which Home-Missionary Ministers are appointed; and that a Report in each case shall be made to the Conference.

2. Candidates for Ordination.—The Conference directs that Candidates for Ordination shall, at or before the May District Meeting, preach before three Ministers of the District, who shall report to the Meeting.

3. Preachers on Trial.—(1.) The Conference, having been informed that in several Circuits the Preachers on Trial have very rarely an opportunity of receiving the Lord's Supper, resolves that, in compliance with a former injunction on this subject, the Superintendents be required to make the necessary arrangements, in their Circuit-Plans, for securing to their junior Colleagues proper facilities for partaking of this Holy Sacrament. (2.) Whenever it shall be found to be practicable, Preachers on Trial shall preach during the District Meetings.

4. Candidates for Admission on Trial.—Those Preachers who are recommended for admission on Trial shall preach in the presence of at least three of the Ministers of the District Committee, (at or about the time of its Annual Meeting in May,) to be selected by the Chairman, exclusively of the Superintendents by whom the Candidates respectively are proposed; and a special report of the Sermons shall be made in the District Meeting, and immediately forwarded in writing to the London Committee of Examination.

5. Attendance of Ministers at Official Meetings.—Mistakcs having arisen on this subject, the Conference deems it proper and necessary to declare, that all the Ministers and Preachers on Trial appointed to a Circuit have a constitutional right to take part as members in our Leaders' Meetings, and in all other official meetings of the Circuits to which they are appointed.

6. Minor District Meetings.—In all cases in which the holding of a Minor District Meeting is rendered necessary, such Meeting, except under the Regulation passed by the Conference in 1840, (Minutes, Vol. IX., p. 94,) shall be held in the District in which the accused party resides, the accused and the accuser selecting respectively two Ministers from the said District, who, with the Chairman thereof, shall constitute the Minor District Meeting.

Should either party refuse or decline to choose two Ministers, to act as members of the Meeting, the Chairman is empowered and directed to nominate them, so that the number required by rule may be made up.

7 Committee on Appeals and other Cases.—At each Conference, the President shall nominate, not later than the second day, a Committee of twenty-one members of the Conference, to whom shall be referred, without discussion, all cases requiring further inquiry touching the character of Ministers or Preachers on Trial, immediately after the reading of the Minutes of District Committees thereupon, or of any notice of charge or appeal relating thereto, or for any reason which the Conference may deem sufficient.

Any complainant or appellant, or any person under inquiry, may object to one in three of the members of the said Committee sitting on his case; and the President shall then appoint some other member of the Conference to act instead of the member so objected to.

Special Cases to be decided upon by the Conference may be referred to the whole Committee, but it shall, for ordinary purposes, be divided into three sections, for each of which a Convener shall be appointed, who shall be responsible for preparing the business of the Committee.

8. Supply of Vacancies.—Instances having occurred in which Superintendents and other Ministers, needing Circuit-supplies on occasion of sickness and various casualties, have applied to the President of the Conference, without *first* taking counsel with the Chairman of the District; the Conference directs the brethren to return to the old plan of first communicating with the Chairman in every such case.

9. Liverpool Minutes.—The Resolutions adopted by the Conference in the year 1820, and usually called the "Liverpool Minutes," besides being read and considered in the Annual Meeting of each District Committee, (as our standing Regubations require,) shall also be read at the Weekly Meeting of Ministers in each Circuit, next following the September Quarterly Meeting ; and the Chairmen of Districts are directed to make inquiry concerning the due observance of this regulation.

10. District Minutes .- The Chairmen of Districts are required to procure three complete copies of the Minutes of the several Annual and other Meetings of the District Committees, transcribed according to the order of time in which such Meetings shall have been held, and duly signed by the Chairman and One of these copies shall be inserted in the District Secretary Repords ; a second shall be reserved for the use of the Chairman and Financial Secretary at the Conference; and a third shall be delivered to the Assistant-Secretaries, on the Wednesday preceding the Conference, and by them to the President during the first week of each Conference, to be preserved under his direction, as a document appertaining to the Connexion. The several copies of the last class shall be written on foolscap paper. that they may be annually bound together in one volume.

11 Annual Return of Members in Society.—The number of Members in Society, and of persons admitted on trial, as taken at the March Quarterly Visitation in each year, and reported in the Circuit Schedules presented at the District Meetings, shall be the number returned on the Minutes of the following Conference

12. Returns of the Military in attendance at our Chapels.— The Conference directs that the returns of the Military in attendance at our Chapels shall include the actual number of soldiers who are declared Wesleyan-Methodists stationed in the Circuit, and not merely the average number in attendance at Divine Service.

13. Circuit Schedules.—In order to bring the state and progress of the work of God in every Circuit distinctly under the examination of the District Meetings, copies of the *Printed* Circuit Schedules, duly filled up, shall be annually produced, examined, and considered. The Chairmen of Districts are made responsible for the execution of this order. (Sec also *Minutes* for 1831, Q. xxv.; Vol. VII., p. 67.)

The Circuit Schedules containing the Returns of the Members in Society are to be forwarded, immediately after the May District Meetings, to the REV. JOHN BOND, Guilford-Street, Russell-Square, London, W.C.

The Education Schedules, having been filled up and presented to the March Quarterly Meeting, are to be sent to the District Educational Secretary, not later than April 10th.

14. Schedules and Circulars on Connexional Business.—As it is obviously desirable, that the Committees appointed by the Conference to manage the scveral departments of the business of the Connexion, in the intervals of its Session, should be furnished with as much statistical information as possible on the matters of business severally confided to their care, the Conference authorizes them, through their appointed Officers, to send, when they deem it expedient, suitable Circulars and Schedules to the Superintendents, or to the Chairmen of Districts, as the case may require ; and directs the Superintendents and Chairmen duly to return such Schedules properly filled up.

15. Annual Examination of Pupil-Teachers in Religious Knowledge.—The Conference directs that the Annual Examination of Pupil-Teachers in Religious Knowledge shall be held on the first Saturday in March; that the questions shall be prepared by the General Committee; that the Examination shall be held, either in the several Circuits by the Superintendent Ministers or their Colleagues, or at suitable places for Central District Examinations, as may be determined by the September District Meetings, and agreed to by the respective School Committees; and that the written answers shall be forwarded to the General Secretary, and shall be valued by a Central Board of Examiners to be elected by the General Committee. The Conference further recommends that, in connection with Central Examinations, Meetings of Teachers and Pupil-Teachers be held under the direction of the Chairman of the District and the District Educational Secretary.

16. Lay-Members of Connexional Committees.—(1.) At the Annual Meeting of each District Committee in Great Britain, one Gentleman, being a member of the Society, shall be chosen by the Lay-Members of the District Committee, to be a member of the Committee of the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund, held preparatory to the Conference; and the Gentleman so chosen shall have the right to attend, and take part in the proceedings of, the Annual Meetings of the Missionary Committee, the Schools' Committee, the Chapel Committee, the Theological Institution Committee, and the Education Committee, held preparatory to the Conference. (2.) In respect to the several Committees of the Connexional Funds, it is resolved, that a certain number of Lay Gentlemen shall retire annually by rotation, the same persons being ineligible for immediate rc-election, except in special cases.

17 Lay-Members of District Committees to be summoned by the Chairman.—It is resolved, That, in future, the Chairman of Districts shall be required to send a circular to the Lay-Members of the District Committee, requesting their attendance on the Wednesday, and, if necessary, on the Thursday, in the week of the Annual District Meeting, specifying the business that will be brought forward, and particularly mentioning any subject that may have been particularly remitted by the Conference to the consideration of such Meeting. A similar circular shall be prepared and sent with reference to the Financial District Meeting.

In order to the carrying out of this Resolution, the Superintendents of Circuits are required to furnish the Chairman of the District with the names and addresses of the Circuit Stewards immediately after the December Quarterly Meeting.

18. Representative to the Stationing Committee.—The Minister who shall be the Representative of each District to the Stationing Committee shall be chosen by the united votes of the Ministers and Laymen who are members of the District Committee.

19. Division of Circuits.—Before District Committees consent to the division of any Circuit, inquiry must be made whether due attention has been paid to satisfactory arrangements for the Trust-Estates affected by the proposed division, especially in reference to any debts existing thereon.

20. Quarterly Fast-Days.— The days upon which the Quarterly Fast, appointed by Rule, is to be observed throughout the Connexion, for the following year, are, Fridays, October 2nd, 1874, January 8th, March 26th, and June 25th, 1875.

21. Rule of 1797 concerning Admission of Members.— Mistakes having occasionally arisen respecting the meaning of the Rule of 1797, on the subject of the admission of persons who are on trial as Members of our Society, the Conference deems it necessary to repeat the statement, That it never was intended that the names of all those who are on trial should be laid before a Leaders' Meeting for distinct and formal discussion; but solely, that if there be, in the opinion of a Leader, any reasonable objection to the character and conduct of any person who is on trial, such objection may be stated by him; and that, if the validity of the objection be established to the satisfaction of the Meeting, a Member's Ticket shall not be given to the person, so objected to, at the Quarterly Visitation.

22. Trial of Members.—When a charge is brought against any Member resident in a place where no Leaders' Meeting is statedly held, the case shall be referred for investigation to the Leaders' Meeting of the principal Society in the Circuit Town. The Leader or Leaders, and the Society Stewards, of the Society of which the accused is a member, shall be associated with the Leaders' Meeting for the purposes of the investigation.

If the accused person is a Trustee, then there shall also be associated with the Leaders' Meeting, as above constituted, the Trustees of the Chapel with which the Society of which he is a Member is connected; or, if there is no such Chapel, then the Trustees of the Chapel in connection with the principal Society in the Circuit Town. But no Trustee shall, in either case, be so associated, unless he is himself a Member of Society in the same Circuit.

23. Reading of the Pastoral Address in Society Meetings.— The Superintendents are directed to appoint special Society Meetings to be held at the principal Chapels in their Circuits, for the purpose of having the Pastoral Address read, and made the subject of suitable remarks and exhortations.

24. Contingent Fund.—In future, all payments on account of Ordinary Deficiencies shall be made through the medium of the Financial Secretaries of Districts. The payments on account of Home Missionaries are to be made directly to and by the Treasurers of the Fund.

25. The Army.—The Chairmen of Districts are directed to inquire of the Superintendents of Circuits in which troops are marched to Divine service in our chapels, the average number of non-commissioned officers and men in attendance; distinguishing the number of Members in Society. These returns must include, also, the actual number of soldiers who are declared Wesleyan-Methodists. The returns given are to be recorded in the District Minutes. If there be no military attendance in the Distriet, a note to that effect shall be inserted.

26. Conference Plan.-The Superintendents of those Circuits in which the Conference may from year to year assemble, shall, with the previous approbation of the President, (as already required by rule,) complete and print, not later than the 15th day of June in cach year, a Plan of the order of preaching in the principal chapels during the Session of the Conference; and shall also, on or before the above date, inform every person whom they have appointed to preach in those chapels, of the time and place of such appointment. And in order that the Plan thus prepared may not be violated, to the disappointment of our friends, and to the great inconvenience of other parties concerned, no Minister who attends the Conference shall be at liberty to make an engagement to preach in any other Circuit, either on the Sabbath, or on any other day, during the period appointed for the meeting of the Conference, or of its various Preparatory Committees, at the time for which his name shall be inserted on the Conference Plan.

27 The Chairmen of Districts are enjoined to make particular inquiries at their Annual Meetings in reference to all the points of Discipline specified in the first Article of the Answer to Q, xyvul, in the *Minutes* of 1825.

The Private Donations in the Classes, on behalf of the Worn-out Ministers' and Ministers' Widows' Auxiliary Fund, shall be entered in the Class-Books at the next September Visitation, and collected in the month of October, and forwarded at once to the District Treasurer. (See *Minutes* of 1851, Q. XXVII., A. 2; Vol. XI., p. 664.)

2. The Private Subscriptions and Public Collections for the New Kingswood and Woodhouse Grove Schools, etc., are to be made in the early part of the month of November, 1874; and the amount, without any deduction on account of Educational Allowances to Children, is to be immediately remitted to the Rev. Frederick Payne, Rhyl, North Wales, one of the General Secretaries for the Schools' Fund. All sums due on account of daughters at the Schools must also be sent to Mr. Payne. Each Superintendent must also send to Mr. Payne a particular account of the sums contributed to the Fund, and of all claims for Educational Allowances in his Circuit, specifying distinctly the names of the children for whose education the claims are made, the *date*, *year*, and *place* of their birth, and the exact number of years during which the allowance has been received.

3. The Annual Subscriptions, due January 1st, and occasional Donations, for the Wesleyan Theological Institution, are to be solicited in every Circuit in the first or second week of January, 1875; and *forthwith* remitted to the Rev John Farrar, *Headingley*, *Leeds.* Post-Office Orders are to be made payable in Leeds. The Public Collection for the Theological Institution is also to be remitted to the Rev. John Farrar.

4. The Public Collection on behalf of the Auxiliary Fund, which may be made in accordance with the recommendation of the Conference, (see p. 432 of these Minutes,) is to be remitted to the Rev. John Rattenbury, 3, Hamilton-Road, Highbury-Park, London, N.

5. The Annual Public Collections for the General Chapel Fund are to be made, and Subscriptions solicited, in the month of February, 1875; and the whole amount should be immediately remitted to the Rev. Messrs. Edwards and Tindall, General Secretaries, Oldham-Street Chapel, Manchester

6. The Yearly Collection in all the Classes is to be made, as usual, at the March Visitation; and the money is to be paid at the District Meetings in May

7 The Private Subscriptions and Public Collections for the Wesleyan Education Fund are to be made in the month of April, 1875; and the money is to be paid, at or before the May District Meeting, to the Financial Secretaries, and by them remitted, with the Circuit Lists, to the Rev. Theophilus Woolmer, Selborne Villa, Wickham-Road, Lewisham-Road, London, S.E.

8. The Private Subscriptions for the Mission-Fund are to be received in all our Circuits, either weekly, monthly, quarterly, or annually, as is most convenient to the Subscribers. The annual Public Collections for that Fund are to be made in all our chapels, and other preaching-places, at the time of the Anniversaries of the several Auxiliary or Branch Societies; or, where no Public Meetings of that kind are held, in the month of May. The money so raised must be remitted, through the District Treasurers, to the General Treasurers, whose address is, Wesleyan Centenary Hall, Bishopsgate-Street-Within, London, E.C.

9. The Private Subscriptions for the Auxiliary Worn-out Ministers' and Widows' Fund are to be solicited in the month of May, 1875; and a list of Subscriptions is to be sent to the Secretary, the Rev. Henry II. Chettle, Woodhouse Grove, Apperley Bridge, near Leeds, not later than the 30th of June. (See Minutes of 1851, Q. XXVIII.; Vol. XI., p. 666.) The money is to be paid on or before the first day of the Conference to the Financial Secretary of the District, and by him to Messrs. Napier and Rattenbury, the Treasurers.

10. The Collections in aid of the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund, for the support and spread of the Gospel in Great Britain and Ireland, are to be made in all our chapels and preaching-places, not later than the second Sunday in July, 1875; but, wherever practicable, before the May District Meeting, and in connection with a Public Meeting, as recommended by the Conference. Subscriptions and Donations are to be paid to the Treasurers as early as possible.

THE ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE TO THE METHODIST SOCIETIES.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,

FROM our Annual Assembly we again send you affectionate pastoral and fraternal greetings. We reassure you of our fervent desire that you may be enriched with all spiritual blessings; and that, in a life of thorough consecration to Christ, whose claims upon our love and service are supreme, both you and we may "walk worthy of the vocation wherewith we are called."

Brought with you into the joyful experience of "the common salvation," children of the same God and Father, disciples of the same Lord and Saviour, partakers of the same "Holy Spirit of promise," how strong and how tender are the bonds of our communion! Such an occasion as this enables us very vividly to realise the closeness and the sacredness of our relation to each other; and also deepens the sense of responsibility and privilege in that ministry which we "have received of the Lord Jesus," and which we exercise on your behalf.

"A dispensation of the Gospel is committed" to us; and never are we perplexed by any doubt as to whether this Gospel is "from heaven, or of men." The Scriptures of the Old Testament, to which the Son of God Himself gave the seal of His authority; the Scriptures of the New Testament, which tell us what Jesus our Lord "began both to do and teach," and what afterwards the Apostles whom He had chosen continued to do and teach in His name, under the guidance of "the Spirit of truth"—these "oracles of God" receive the fullest homage of our intellect and our heart. We would, on the one hand, most carefully and with equal vigilance guard the Divine Word from the criticism which takes away everything that is supernatural;

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and, on the other hand, from those traditions and teachings of men that, too often, make "the Word of God of none effect."

While we greatly mourn over that spirit of hostile unbelief which seems ever eager to catch at anything that, by some effort of ingenuity, may be turned into a weapon of attack upon the Bible, be assured we are not "shaken in mind," as if the foundations of our faith were beginning to betray signs of weakness: nor are we "troubled" about the final issue of the strife. Our only concern is with respect to those who just at present are suffering injury and peril from the unbelief which is so actively and insidiously at work. As for ourselves, the religion we hold and teach is the subject of our deepest convictions: "we believe, and therefore speak."

We strongly feel that one of our most urgent wants is more Divine power in our public services. When we think of the large numbers of people who, week after week, join in the worship which we conduct, and listen to the truths which we preach, we are profoundly sensible of the vast importance of the work in which we are engaged ; and we are forcibly reminded how much depends upon our fitness for it, and our fidelity in doing it. To live in habitual communion with God, so that we may be ever ready to lead the congregation "into the holiest by the blood of Jesus," and may learn the secret of that pleading which is "power with God;" so to "preach the Word " that every conscience and heart shall feel that a Divine message is being delivered; to arouse the careless and worldly from their deep and deadly sleep; to guide the awakened and anxious soul to its one only and sure resting-place in Christ; to give to the people of God in their cares and conflicts that portion in due season that shall encourage them to go on their way rejoicing, "strong in the Lord, and in the power of His might,"-in a word, to gain the highest ends of Christian worship and teaching, --- this is our hearts' most fervent desire and prayer.

But, while dealing faithfully with ourselves in this matter. allow us, dear brethren, also to deal faithfully with you. For remember that to the hearer of the Gospel, to the worshipper in the assembly, belong responsibilities as well as to the preacher. The task of awakening interest in religious services, and securing the benefit intended by them, must not be left altogether to the minister. Unless you bring to the house of God a temper of prayerful self-inquiry and of expectation, doing your best to engage your own powers of thought and feeling, you will not be very likely to catch the true spirit of devotion. nor will the Word preached very much profit you. So that while we must take heed how we preach, and how we conduct our services, you must equally take heed how you hear, and also how you engage in these services.

We would speak earnestly to you about the importance of securing and maintaining a clear consciousness of your accept-The sure trust of the contrite heart in Jesus ance with God. brings "the knowledge of salvation by the remission of sins," and habitual "looking unto Jesus" keeps "this pearl of great price" safe. Whenever the New Testament dwells on the experience of believers in Christ, it is not in language of doubt and hesitation that it speaks, but in words of confidence and assurance : "We know that we have passed from death unto life :" "The Spirit itself beareth witness with our spirit, that we are the children of God ;" We "joy in God through our Lord Jesus Christ." Enter, brethren, into this rest and blessedness : live in the bright light of the Lord's countenance ; for has not Christ declared it to be His good pleasure that "your joy might be full"? And does not St. Paul pray for the disciples that they might be "filled with all joy and peace in believing"? And besides the gladness of heart that filial confidence in God creates, you will find in the hour of conflict with temptation, and for the demands of self-denying obedience, that "the joy of the Lord is your strength." Moreover, you are called to be saints, a "holy people unto the Lord your God." The purposes and provisions of our Redeemer's love and power bid you press onward to a salvation in which sin is all destroyed; bid you take head that, by the renewing of the Holy Ghost, the virtues of the Christian life reach a maturity of growth in which you may bring forth fruit to perfection.

A religion thus enriched with ever-enlarging experiences of Divine grace, and, by the energy of its more abundant life, showing its reality and power in the practice of whatsoever things are true, and honest, and just, and pure, and lovely, and of good report, will give a decision and distinctness of Christian character that shall be "known and read of all men."

Business-transactions of doubtful morality you will have nothing whatever to do with, for you exercise yourselves "to have always a conscience void of offence toward God, and toward men." Amusements that would weaken the vigour of heavenly-mindedness, and bring you into perilous association with the frivolous and worldly, you will not join in, for you are seeking truer and more enduring pleasures, and you are obedient to that word, "Be not conformed to this world." Luxuries of forbidden self-indulgence, and vanity of personal display, you will avoid, for you are under welcome law to a Master and Lord who has given the precept and the pattern of self-denial and lowliness, and it is your aim to "follow His steps."

This is the religion whereunto you are called. It meets all the demands that Christ makes when He says, "Ye are the light of the world;" "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven." So pure and noble a life will tell with commanding force on surrounding society. You will make yourselves felt as men in whom there dwell spiritual convictions strong enough to bow to their authority all earthly things.

True, the unbelieving and half-hearted, because you walk not with them, may sneer at what they call your preciseness and puritanism; but in their deepest heart they will do homage to conduct which they know is only the consistent representation of Christian faith. Jesus, whose "well done" is your reward. will approve you ; and He will be able to use you as instruments to extend His kingdom. You will be those disciples in whom their Lord's joy is "fulfilled," and of whom He says, "I am glorified in them." O that your hearts and ours may be all aglow with love to our Master and Lord, and that in the impulse of this sacred affection it may be our life's one purpose to serve and please Him ! No higher aim could we propose to ourselves, and surely to no lower ought we for one moment to come "Ye are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, a holy down. nation, a peculiar people; that ye should show forth the praises of Him who hath called you out of darkness into His marvellous light."

Godliness such as this will find joy in the ordinances of Christian worship, and in communion with God in prayer. Moreover it is here that it will gather nourishment and power for steady progress. Therefore neglect not "the assembling of yourselves together." Welcome the hour that invites you to the Lord's table. Ilis own hands spread the heavenly feast, and still He says, "This do in remembrance of Me." It is then you renew your confession of trust in the "precious blood" "shed for the remission of sins," and afresh own Christ as your King and sovereign Lord. While your own faith and love are strengthened, you at the same time bear your testimony to those glorious truths of redemption of which the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper is the expression. You declare that whoever may deny Christ, you own Him; and whoever may slight Him, you make much of Him as your only Saviour and hope.

Value also the communion of saints. The fellowship of the class-meeting began in the desire to "flee from the wrath to come :" there was a consciousness of the reality of unseen and eternal things : the deepest springs of human thought and feeling were moved, and "out of the abundance of the heart" the newly-awakened "spake often one to another." And as long as religion continues to be a matter of carnest personal experience, opportunities for mutual sympathy and for counsel will be sought. It is a very significant fact,—one which ought to have much weight with us at the present time,—that wherever religion is working as a positive power in the human heart, the classmeeting, suitably conducted, is just that which meets the want created by revived religious feeling and earnestness. On the other hand,—and again we say, let it be most thoughtfully considered,—where spiritual power is low, and the life of religion is lacking or feeble, there the class-meeting declines, and some begin to ask, "Cannot we do without it? Is it suitable to our day?" Such questions are themselves signs of spiritual declension. Not need the class-meeting now! Then most assuredly we do need that which would make us value it, and which would very soon, and satisfactorily, reply to all questions about dispensing with it. Nay, brethren, let us rather enter more truly into the spirit and meaning of a religion that tells us "we are members one of another," and because of this strong, living sympathy, bids us "confess our faults one to another," and "pray one for another," and "exhort one another," and "admonish one another," and "comfort one another."

In reviewing the past year we see signs of prosperity, which encourage our confidence and hope. Our record of members shows an increase of three thousand and sixty-five, with twenty-four thousand seven hundred and ninety-four on trial. We lay not too much stress on these numerical returns. There are arrangements in our economy which render them necessary, and accordingly we register them. Still, while not exaggerating their value, we are persuaded that they reveal features of our spiritual condition which always deserve our most thoughtful attention. Increase in our Societies means that a good work of religious awakening has been going on, and this, too, is accompanied by a quickened spiritual life in existing Church-members. Only as conversions to God are taking place, and as strength of Christian principle and fervour of Christian feeling are deepening in God's people, is the real end of our work and ministry answered. Nothing whatever that stops short of these results can satisfy us. Let our word come "in power and in the Holy Ghost," and the Churches will bc "established in the faith," and will increase in number.

During the year ninety-four chapels have been built, and the erection of one hundred and twenty-nine has been sanctioned. The enlarged opportunities thus created to celebrate the services of a simple and pure worship, and to expound the Word of God, awaken in us gratitude and hope. In some instances munificent gifts, the contributions of ample and consecrated resources, have been freely presented to carry on this good work; and in many other cases, out of less abundant means, and at the cost of much self-denial, those who value "the truth as it is in Jesus" have "devised liberal things." Very highly do we appreciate the generous spirit of which these free-will offerings are the indication, and greatly does it encourage us. But feelings of another kind also arise within us. We are forcibly impressed with the grave responsibility resting upon us to do our utmost, that these chapels may truly fulfil the purposes for which they are erecteda responsibility, dear brethren, which we divide with yourselves. for to you as well as to us does it belong. All the guarantees that human forethought can provide secure that in our chapels the truths of Scripture shall be honestly preached. But we are persuaded that it is by no means to this sort of defence that we must look as our chief bulwark. If ministers can depart from the faith,—as it is clearly expressed in Holy Scripture they may. even so can they depart from any definitions of that faith, however clearly they may be laid down in authorized Church-standards. Especially of late have we seen, and mourned to see, how easy it is to break away from the restraints of articles of belief when a spirit contrary to them has come in. Those men, and only those. in whom the Gospel of Christ is a personal experience, and whose own spiritual life is nourished up in the words of faith and good doctrine, can be relied on to keep inviolate the trust committed Then seek from the Head of the Church Himself a to them. succession and increase of true-hearted preachers and pastors, who will never "handle the Word of God deceitfully, but by manifestation of the truth," will commend themselves to every man's conscience in the sight of God."

In our educational work an increase of seven thousand three hundred and forty-five day-scholars; of ninety-eight Sundayschools; of twenty-two thousand two hundred and twenty scholars; and of one thousand six hundred and seventy-seven teachers and officers, shows an encouraging measure of progress. We are very wishful, with yourselves, that our Schools should contribute more largely to the growth of Christ's Church, by bringing our children and young people to religious decision. Especially should the most watchful care be bestowed on the elder scholars, and those who are leaving school. By endeavouring to organize classes for their mental and spiritual culture, and by offering every facility for them to become habitual attendants upon our worship, --- in a word, by showing them unfailing sympathy and attention, ---should we seek strongly and permanently to attach them to the ordinances of religion.

No subject more constantly engages our solicitude than the religious welfare of your own children. From year to year we renew our inquiry with respect to it, and ask how our pastoral relation to our young people may be more successfully fulfilled. We long to see them choosing "the better part," and, in early decision for Christ, preparing themselves for future years of invaluable service to Him. How greatly would it add to the joy of your home circles if this most desirable object were accomplished! But whatever we may do, if we are to succeed, we must have your own active and prayerful co-operation. The literature that you introduce into your families, the habits you allow your children to adopt, the society in which you encourage them to form their friendships and enjoy their recreations, continually and powerfully influence them; and require on your part, therefore, the exercise of all possible prudence and vigilance.

We would especially urge upon you the importance of a proper attention to domestic worship. Amidst the pressing claims of household and business engagements, many find it difficult to reserve opportunities for the exercise of family religion. But the home that is not "sanctified by the Word of God and prayer," suffers a most grievous loss. Then withhold not those blessings which always descend in bountiful grants of good things on the families that call upon the name of the Lord. And, moreover, make it plain to your children and your servants that you set a high value on the observance which gathers them around you, that you may read to them the Scriptures, and kneel with them at "the throne of grace."

We avail ourselves of this opportunity of again assuring you of the deep sense we entertain of the terrible evils which intemperance brings upon our country. The subject has afresh engaged our careful attention, and you will see from the resolutions which the Conference has adopted, that we are wishful to take our share in attempts to suppress the vice which we all so greatly deplore.

The meeting of the Missionary Committee of Review brought into prominent notice various features of our work in other lands, both near and afar off. Many "signs of the times" are encouraging, and we again commend to your active sympathies and prayers our beloved brethren, who, in their separation from us to foreign service in the one Master's kingdom, prize your remembrance of them.

We are glad to be able to mention special visitations of Divine grace which have been given in various places. In Cornwall, in the North of England, in Scotland, and elsewhere, our own brethren, and those of other Churches, have seen mighty manifestations of the power of the Spirit of God. Ought we not to continue "instant in prayer" that a work like this may become general, that awakenings and conversions may everywhere advance the kingdom of Christ ? Nothing could more effectually rebuke the unbelief which questions the powers of the unseen world, and which speaks contemptuously of Christianity as a system wellnigh worn out, and about to surrender its place of influence to something else. "Let it be known," implored the prophet in the time of the people's blindness and unbelief-" let it be known this day that Thou art God in Israel, and that I am Thy servant." The token that was asked appeared, and the fire from heaven showed, beyond all doubt, at whose altar the prophet served. And now, when that Gospel, which is "the truth of God," comes to the human heart with converting energy, it is manifestly declared to be "the power of God," and it carries the seal of its Divine origin in the greatness and blessedness of its operations.

We joyfully and gratefully recognise the cheerful and selfdenying labours which our Leaders, Local Preachers, Teachers, Tract Distributors, and other fellow-helpers in the work of the Lord render. Your ready co-operation with us, in seeking to extend the cause of Christ, strengthens our own hands and hearts in the service of our common Lord; and we can truly say that we "remember without ceasing your work of faith, and labour of love, and patience of hope."

We would also anew impress upon all our people that every disciple of Jesus, whether holding any office or not, is bound to take his own share in the glorious task of winning souls. There is a work for the Master which each servant has to do, and which, if he do it not, will be left undone. To every one of you are given gifts, and He who distributeth "to every man severally as He will," says, "Occupy till I come." And even when you toil on and seem to gather little fruit, be patient and hopeful: you know who has said, "In due season we shall reap, if we faint not." He who walketh amidst the golden candlesticks, which "are the churches," fixes upon you a look of loving approval, and tells you, "I know thy works, and thy labour, and thy patience;.....and for My name's sake thou hast laboured, and hast not fainted."

In receiving the record of those who have departed hence unwavering in their trust in Him who is "the Resurrection and the Life," and in reading the roll of those among ourselves who have entered into rest, we have vividly realised the unbroken fellowship which joins the whole family in heaven and earth :--

> "Even now by faith we join our hands With those that went before ; And greet the blood-besprinkled bands On the eternal shore."

Very earnestly do we ask you to cherish with us a deep sense of our dependence upon the Spirit of God. As we dwell upon our multiplied agencies, ever at work, we sometimes hear it said, "Our success is not according to our toil." Let us beware of supposing that because we are active, we must of necessity be prosperous. "Without Me ye can do nothing;" "Not by might, nor by power, but by My Spirit, saith the Lord." How do these words rebuke the busy temper that looks too much to the energy of human work, and the skilful adjustment of human arrangements ! "Our sufficiency is of God;" and as we turn to this sufficiency we would re-invigorate your faith and ours.

Do not "exceeding great and precious promises" raise high our expectations? With the universal Church each one of us says, "I believe in the Holy Ghost." Do we well ponder what great things are included in such a confession of faith as this? What is there, whether for our own personal need, or for the world's subjugation to Christ, to which this "power from on high" is not equal ?

In the hour of His disciples' weakness and shame, when they could not cast out the unclean spirit, did not their Lord tell them that their discomfiture and defeat were altogether their "Because of your unbelief," and, "This kind own fault? goeth not out but by prayer and fasting," explained everything. Even so have we Divine resources for our work if we were only ready to avail ourselves of them. Let us then unite hearty labour with fervent prayer and strong, unwavering faith; so shall we come better to understand what the prophet meant when he said, "Cry out and shout, thou inhabitant of Zion: for great is the Holy One of Israel in the midst of thee." "Now unto Him that is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us, unto Him be glory in the Church by Christ Jesus throughout all ages, world without end. Amen."

THE ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE IRISH CONFERENCE. 1874, TO THE BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1874.

BELOVED FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

WE once more avail ourselves of the opportunity afforded us at our annual gathering of conveying to you our fraternal greeting, and the assurance of our unabated affection towards you.

We have met this year under circumstances of peculiar blessing,

which cause our hearts to glow with special gratitude to the Giver of all good; and we have heard with much joy, from our honoured President and his companions, of the high honour God has conferred on your labours during the past year, and the large increase of members in your Churches. We also are able to report a small increase; our only cause of regret being that the number is not a thousand-fold greater. But still the tide of emigration continues to flow from our shores, and many-very many--of our beloved and most valued people go to swell the Churches in other lands. For ourselves, we cannot but sometimes feel regret at this continued out-flow; but believing, as we do, in the over-ruling Providence of God, we know that this also shall tend to His glory, and to the bencfit of that one Church of which Christ is both Head and King. We, therefore, cannot be discouraged, but feel ourselves honoured if, in any measure, we may be accounted worthy to be agents in His hand of bringing those to the knowledge of the truth, who, in other lands, may be the founders of Churches, and in other climes may uphold the standard of the Cross.

After all our losses by death, emigration, and other causes, we thank God that we can report an increase of sixty-threc members; and if, with this continued drain upon us, we can maintain our numbers, it is a proof—having reference to the population of the country at large—that we have made real advances during the year that is past.

We are thankful that the ranks of our active ministry have not been thinned by death during the year; but two of our venerable Supernumeraries—the Revs. John Carey and Thomas Meredith—have been summoned to their heavenly reward. They served the Church long and well, and had earned for themselves a good degree in our ministry. God highly honoured their labours by enabling them to win many souls for Christ, such as shall be their glory and joy at the day of His appearing. "They rest from their labours, and their works do follow them."

While these venerable mcn have been removed from our midst, God is raising up others to stand in their stead. Still doth

"The bright succession run."

We have received into full connexion with us, at this Conference, six young brethren who had completed the term of their probation, and who give promise of being able ministers of our Lord Jesus Christ; while six others have been received as Candidates for our work, and have been appointed to our College, or placed on our list of reserve.

As last year we were separated from your Auxiliary Fund, and received from you at that time a sum to form the basis of an Auxiliary Fund for our Worn-out Ministers and Ministers' Widows, you will doubtless be gratified to learn that, during the sittings of our Conference in this city, we were favoured with a visit from Mr. Alderman M'Arthur, of London,—himself a son of Irish Methodism,—who, having thoughtfully and wisely interested himself in our affairs, set a noble example by a munificent contribution, and in other ways stimulated the minds and hearts of our people, so that in one meeting, held under his presidency, "the riches of their liberality abounded" in such wise that $\pm 10,000$ were promised in augmentation of this important Fund; and we expect that yet further sums will be forthcoming to increase it, and in furtherance of the object we have in view.

We are thankful that, in all other respects, the finances of our Church are, on the whole, in a healthy condition; and we trust that the Home Mission Fund especially may be so enlarged as to enable us to meet the demand which is made for our ministry in different parts of the country, where, heretofore, we have had no agency, and where, if we had the means, we would gladly comply with the calls made upon us.

We feel a deep interest in all your affairs, and highly appreciate your efforts to sustain Methodism in the villages of Great Britain : and earnestly pray that those efforts may be crowned with abundant success. We mourn when we hear of a thinly disguised Poperv in your midst. We—as is well known to you—have a fully developed Romanism in this country, of a type not equalled in any other land; and we cannot but feel a deep and painful interest in everything that pertains to this God-dishonouring system; and we look to you, honoured Fathers and Brethren, in connection with the other Nonconforming Churches in your land. to be the defenders of that faith for which many in your highly favoured country contended, in ages past, unto death. We were, therefore, greatly encouraged in hearing of the closer union manifested between you and those descendants of the noble Puritans who were received and greeted by you, in the name of our common Lord, at your last Conference in Newcastle-upon-Tyne. We pray that that union may be yet more closely cemented, and that the free churches of Britain may present a bold, undaunted front to the Man of Sin, so that his efforts to "conquer and rule the imperial race" may be frustrated, and that England may continue to be, in the future, the home of Protestant truth and liberty, as she has nobly been during the centuries since the glorious Reformation.

We also hail your continued and strenuous efforts to counteract the evil that is in the world by the diffusion of a pure and elevated literature. The power of the press is so great in this day, that we cannot but rejoice in the noble exertions you make to meet the demands of our times, without sacrificing our religious principles, or pandering to the taste of the multitudes who seek only unhealthy stimulants in the current literature of the day. We are happy to find there is still such a demand for our incomparable hymns, as to induce you to issue those cheap editions of our Hymn-Book which you have lately sent out; and, knowing that the profits arising from the sale of those works go to the support and spread of vital religion in the world, we hope to see a large increase in the circulation of all works published at the Book-Room.

We also bid you God-speed in your efforts to reach the youth of your Church by the means of Higher Education, in the establishment of seminaries in proximity to the splendid Universities of Oxford and Cambridge. You may take encouragement in your labours in this direction from the fact that both our Institutions established for this purpose have succeeded beyond the hopes of many of their most sanguine promoters; and if, in this land of comparative poverty, so much has been achieved, it cannot be unreasonable to expect that in wealthy England much more shall be accomplished, and your labours crowned with marked success.

We thank you for sending to us our beloved President, the Rev. George T. Perks, M.A., and his companions, the Revs. Gervasc Smith, M.A., and J. H. James, D.D. We met them again with unabated pleasure, and these honoured messengers of the Churches have become to us "brethren beloved." Their kindness and courtesy in private, their wise and cheering counsels in Conference, and their able expositions of the Word of life in public, have confirmed our former love and esteem for them, and led us to thank God that, through your kindness, we have again been favoured with the presence of these honoured ministers of Christ. They carry with them our fraternal regards, and we pray that they may long continue as pillars in the Church of God.

We regretted the absence of the Ex-President, the Rev. Luke H. Wiseman, M.A., who was prevented from coming to us as one of the companions of the President; but we rejoiced to meet once more the Rev. William Arthur, M.A., who takes a deep interest in, and is well acquainted with, the interests of Methodism in Ireland. He rendered us valuable counsel in several of our deliberations, and ministered the Word of life with his accustomed ability and power.

We nominate the Rev. Wallace M'Mullen our Delegate, and appoint the Revs. Oliver M'Cutcheon and George Alley, his companions, as Representatives to your Conference. They have our fullest confidence, and are well able to give you every information concerning our work in this country.

You will rejoice to learn that in many parts of Ireland, and especially in the north, there have been gracious revivals and "showers of blessing" during the past year. In some places hundreds have been converted to God, are now rejoicing in His favour, and are adorning "the dcotrine of God our Saviour" by a holy walk and conversation. We long to see this land visited with

"The o'erwhelming power of saving grace!"

We desire to see her people living for God, that our country may be a praise in the earth, and a blessing to other nations. With this desire we are about to return to our various fields of labour. and we do so in buoyant hope. We never more fully realised than now that the work in which we are engaged is what Mr. Wesley termed it-"a great work of God." We never felt greater confidence in our ancient principles, and the noble theology which we inherit from our fathers. We confidently believe, notwithstanding the difficulties which surround usdifficulties which can only be understood by those who experience them---that "the sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God," is sufficient, when wielded by the arm of faith, to conquer and overthrow all enemies. We were never more convinced than now, that it is "not by might, nor by power," but by the Spirit of "the Lord of Hosts" we are to prevail. "The weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God to the pulling down of strongholds." We "seek not great things" for ourselves; we seek not earthly patronage or support; but go forth in the strength of the Lord God, ---

> "Strong in the strength which He supplies Through His Eternal Son."

We depart, and expect a gloriously successful year. "In the name of our God we will set up our banners."

Praying that on both sides of the Channel there may be a mighty outpouring of the Holy Spirit during the ensuing year: that thousands may be added to the militant host of God; and that the bonds of unity betwixt us may be more elosely drawn, and thoroughly perpetuated; we are yours in the bonds of our common Lord.

THE ANSWER OF THE BRITISH CONFERENCE, 1874, TO THE ADDRESS OF THE IRISH CONFERENCE OF 1874.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,

THE sentiments of fraternal regard contained in your Address we highly esteem and fully reciprocate. We serve the same Lord and Saviour, we hold the same faith, and we are partakers with you of like precious promises. As our aims are identical and our enterprises similar we sympathize with you in your difficulties, and in your successes we feel a holy joy. We are glad to hear that your educational establishments maintain their efficiency, and that you are resolved to render them more adequate to your increasing necessities. As you are aware, we have sanctioned a scheme of Higher Education at Cambridge, and have shown our appreciation of the designs of its promoters in an unequivocal manner. At the same time we have not forgotten the claims of the destitute, nor relaxed our efforts to rescue neglected children from a life of crime. We would come behind no Christian community in the range of our philanthropy, and would confer upon all who need our help such assistance as God has put it within our power to bestow.

We congratulate you on the noble manner in which you have inaugurated the work of placing your Auxiliary Fund on a firm financial basis. You will thus relieve those who are naturally depressed at the prospect of relinquishing, to some extent, their much-loved toil, and spare them the sorrow which penury would inflict upon them in their retirement. But we would give emphasis to what has never been entirely absent from your thoughts, that no solitary act of generosity can take the place of continuous well-doing, nor will the present munificence preclude the recurrence of fresh calls for liberality in the future.

We remember, dear Brethren, the very arduous character of your labours and the specially adverse circumstances of many of the Societies under your care. While there are places in which Protestantism holds its own, and Methodism is honoured for its services and beloved for its catholicity, there are others in which your position is that of beleaguered garrisons. Your trials call forth our heartiest prayers that He who said to His servant, "Fear not: I am thy shield, and thy exceeding great reward," may have you in His holy keeping. We rejoice to find that your facilities for evangelistic enterprise are increasing; and we trust that fanaticism will no longer harass you in your efforts to spread Scriptural holiness through the land. The future will not be as the past; and a Church which has won its way in spite of such difficulties as your history proves you to have encountered will not fail under different conditions to fulfil the fresh obligations that may devolve upon it. We are persuaded that you will be found ready to supply all that the exigencies of the times may demand, and should the altered circumstances of an influential Church in your midst seem to furnish you with another call to earnest effort, you will be found able to undertake the labour imposed upon you. May you, dear Brethren, be enabled to respond to every summons of Providence and of grace, and may He who, in seasons of trial, endued you with a spirit of brave endurance breathe into your hearts that holy ardour which longs to go up and possess the good land of promise.

In the face of a foe who prides himself upon his absolute unity, everything that tends to consolidate Protestant communities is pure gain. When union can be effected without compromise of doctrine or destruction of Church organizations, it becomes in the highest degree desirable. We are therefore rejoiced to find that the difficulties attendant upon union with another branch of Methodism in Ireland are not so formidable as they once appeared to be. We trust that in this, as in other matters, you will receive such Divine guidance as may lead your feet into the way of peace.

We have received your Representatives to our Conference as brethren beloved, and their public utterances have tended to increase our knowledge of your labours, and cement the ties of affection already subsisting between us. The resolution of your Conference on the subject of lay-delegation, which they have handed to us, has been referred by us to the consideration of a Committee to meet during the year, with which Committee the brethren appointed by you will confer.

With reference to our own affairs we will make no lengthy statements, as the documents containing evidences of our material and spiritual prosperity are easily accessible to you. But we cannot refrain from asking you to rejoice with us in the evident tokens of the Divine Presence with which we are favoured. We also ask you to remember us in your prayers that we may be "steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord."

We have appointed the Rev. George T. Perks, M.A., Ex-President, the Rev. Dr. James, and the Rev. John Walton to accompany our honoured and beloved President, the Rev. W M. Punshon, LL.D., on his visit to your next Conference.

In conclusion, we pray llim who has prepared our way to the throne of His power, by teaching us to regard it as the throne of His grace, to grant you those endowments of the Spirit of His Son, that shall thoroughly furnish you for every good word and work. The consciousness of our own necessities increases the fervency of our intercessions on your behalf, that you may realise the fulfilment of our Lord's purpose in giving Himself for the Church, "that He might present it to Himself a glorious Church, not having spot, or wrinkle, or any such thing."

ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH IN FRANCE AND SWITZERLAND, 1874, TO THE BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1874.

DEARLY BELOVED FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

It is with fervent and unfeigned affection that we greet you in the Lord. Your continued care for our welfare, and your practical sympathy, so often manifested on our behalf, have acquired for you a claim to our gratitude which will never be forgotten.

Our Conference has met this year in the town of Nîmes, in the neighbourhood of which some of our most important Circuits are situated. Our sittings have all been saddened, and our work has been rendered more difficult in many ways, by the death, in the early part of the year, of our beloved President, the Rev. Emile F. Cook. His wise and kind counsel has been missed in our Conference, and many times, when difficulties have seemed to block up our way, we have felt the lack of those cheering words of hope, which he could speak even in the most trying circumstances. Our Churches are deprived of his pastoral care, and Evangelical Protestantism in France has lost an able and earnest advocate.

Our difficulties have been further increased by the illness of one of our oldest ministers, the Rev. Gédéon Jaulmes, of Lausanne. His retirement from active service, although we trust it will be only temporary, left vacant the charge of an important Circuit, and the directorship of the Students' Home. Another respected brother, who had come over to us from another Church, has, to our great regret, seen fit to withdraw. These circumstances have rendered it difficult for us to meet at once the request of the Jersey French Circuit; but we will do our utmost to make a suitable arrangement.

We cannot report an increase in our Societies. The present number of members and probationers is two thousand and twelve, which is nearly the same as the number reported to our last Conference. On the other hand, our congregations are increasing, and there is an addition of more than ten per cent. to the number of our Sunday-scholars.

We have strongly felt the lack of proper men for the work of the ministry among us. This year we have received one preacher on trial, and four young men will be either received into the Students' Home, or occupied in the work. Yet still our wants in this respect are far from being met.

Financial embarrassments prevent us from extending our work as we desire to do. We are wanting in funds for the support and increase of the ministry. Our Circuits are striving to do more. The increase during the past two years is more than sixteen per cent. But to place us in a satisfactory position, even with our present limited staff of ministers, it would require that every Circuit should at once double its contributions. Our prospective deficit for the year now commencing is £500.

And yet we take courage. It seems to us that, although still suffering from past years of disaster, we have seen the worst, and are advancing really to a better state of things. Two of our Circuits have had cheering and extensive revivals. And both the sittings of the Conference, and the public services held in connection with it, have been marked by blessings from on high. Our souls are looking up to the Author of all good; and we would adopt as our watchword for the ensuing year, the great truth which your delegate brought before us, as his message to us from the Lord,—Holiness is power.

Since the year 1859 we have not had the pleasure of seeing among us an official delegate from the British Conference. It gave us therefore much satisfaction to welcome among us this year the Rev W Gibson, B.A., as your Representative. We cordially thank you for his presence and his counsels. The ardent sympathy which he feels for us, and his high hopes for the future of France, have cheered our hearts. We have spoken with him, freely and fully, of the present position of our Church in France, of our sorrow because we have been compelled to retire from important posts formerly occupied by us, and because. in presence of the vast work of evangelization to be accomplished in this country, we find ourselves without resources. How glad should we be if, within the next five years, we could place an earnest minister in every large town in France!

We carnestly hope that the Memorial forwarded by ns in 1872, on the subject of uniting our laymen with us in our Conferences, will receive your prompt and carnest consideration. A friendly but strong pressure is put on us by the majority of our Circuits. And it will be difficult, if not impossible, for us to retain the exclusively ministerial composition of our Conference, in presence of the different organization of all other Protestant Churches around us.

We have appointed as our Representative to your Conference. the Rev James Hocart, the oldest minister among us still in active service, and we doubt not that you will find in him an able and earnest advocate of the claims of our work.

We have elected, subject to your ratification, the Rev. J. P. Cook, B.A., as our President for the ensuing year His laborious services for many years in different departments of our work, have earned for him our high esteem and gratitude.

Receive, dear and honoured Fathers and Brethren, our affectionate salutations in our Lord Jesus Christ.

THE ANSWER OF THE BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1874 TO THE ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE METHO-DIST CHURCH IN FRANCE AND SWITZERLAND, 1874.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,

 W_E have received and read your affectionate Address with deep, and even unusual interest. We heartily reciprocate every expression of your brotherly regard for us, and pray that you and we may ever "stand fast in one spirit, with one mind striving together for the faith of the Gospel."

The severe loss you have sustained during the past year, in the death of the President of your Conference, has excited our deepest sympathy. The Rev. Emile F. Cook, honoured by us all, from the first, for the name which he bore, quickly gained in this country by his personal excellence the esteem and affection of a multitude of friends. We sorely miss the presence in our assembly of this devoted servant of Christ. With you, we mourn the sudden removal of our beloved friend, so wise a counsellor, so faithful in witnessing for his Master, whether in the midst of his flock at home, or amongst perils by sea and by land, so winning and attractive a pattern of a Christian minister. His early death will not be premature, if his example attract others to follow him as he followed Christ.

We read with pain of the other losses which you have sustained in the ranks of your ministers. The scanty supply of candidates for the ministry among you has been the subject of our serious consideration. We cannot doubt that the Head of the Church will, in answer to your instant prayer, grant you the most signal mark of His favour, in calling men to preach His word,-men who shall be made ministers of the Gospel "according to the gift of the grace of God given unto "them "by the effectual working of His power." We fervently hope and pray that no hindrances or embarrassments of any kind may have power to hold back the labourers from entering into the vineyard of the Lord. We rejoice to hear that your Students' Home will not want occupants. We are endeavouring to devise a plan by which some assistance may be rendered to the funds of this excellent and most useful Institution.

Your esteemed Representative, the Rev. J. Hocart, has for many years possessed our full confidence and warm affection. He has faithfully set before us the magnitude of the work in which you are engaged, and the peculiar difficulties which beset your enterprise. Our brother, the Rev. W Gibson, B.A., an unfailing and unwearied advocate of your cause, has powerfully seconded your Representative in his endeavour to describe the high mission of Methodism in France. As we have listened to their statements and appeals, we have been drawn into closer fellowship with you, and have been inspired with a more earnest desire to strengthen your hands in God.

We rejoice exceedingly to receive tidings of increased prosperity, in the enlargement of your congregations and Sundayschools, and in the growth of the spirit of Christian liberality and self-denial for the Master's sake. The revival of religion in some of your Circuits we hail as a sure token of the presence of Him who is the Lord and Giver of Life, the Author of holiness, the Source of power. We unite with you in fervent prayer that the influence of the Holy Spirit may be felt by you in all your dwellings and in all your assemblies, assured that, through His power, the holy waters shall flow forth from you into all the desert land, and "everything shall live whither the river cometh."

You will rejoice to know that our Societies in this land have not been without manifestations of the Divine favour. The increase in our numbers is not large. In some places the Lord has added very many to the Church, but in others we have to mourn over loss. We can discern, however, tokens of a deeper spiritual life and an increased earnestness of religious effort in many parts of our Connexion. Our hearts are filled with gratitude for this. With a heightened sense of our responsibility, we gird ourselves again for our work, "looking unto Jesus," our Master and Lord, for grace to be faithful in His service. Many other Churches in England and Scotland have recently been gladdened by the revival of the work of God. For them, for you, and for ourselves, we seek the power from on high which will enable us to bear a consistent and prevailing testimony against formalism, unbelief, and every form of sin.

The Memorial which we received from you on the subject of uniting the laymen of your Church with yourselves in your annual Conference, has been earefully considered. As, however, the question is (as you are aware) very difficult and complex, we have again referred it to a select Committee, which will report to the next Conference.

We gladly accede to your request that our highly esteemed brother, the Rev. J. P. Cook, B.A., may be appointed to be your next President.

In abiding hope and confidence that the year on which we are entering may be crowned with the goodness of the Lord, and His blessing on our common work, we bid you farewell in His name.

ADDRESS OF THE GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES, 1872, TO THE BRITISH CONFERENCE, 1874.

REVEREND AND DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

"Grace be unto you, and peace, from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ."

Your letter, dated London, April 13th, 1872, and conveyed to us by your Delegates, afforded us great satisfaction. We thank God "always on your behalf, for the grace of God which is given you by Jesus Christ; that in every thing ye are enriched by Him, in all utterance, and in all knowledge; even as the testimony of Christ was confirmed in you: so that ye come behind in no gift; waiting for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ."

Sustaining, as you do, peculiar historic relations to Mr. Wesley, the founder, under God, of our common Methodism, it is not unreasonable that the various divisions of the great Methodistic household should look to you for a continual example of that Missionary zeal which can be satisfied with nothing less than the subjugation of the world to Christ; a devotion to the pure doctrines of the Gospel which will maintain them at all times and in all circumstances, allowing no departure from the form of sound words; and a compassion for sinners which will not consent that any results shall be regarded as prosperity which do not include their conversion to God, their sanctification, and their final "entrance into the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ;" and we rejoice in the assurance, from time to time, that our confidence is fully justified.

Your Mission stations encircle the globe. Steadily pursuing the course you have pursued, it will soon be said of your Missions : "There is no speech nor language where their voice is not heard. Their line is gone out through all the earth, and their words unto the end of the world." It is an eminent attestation of the Divine origin of Methodism, and of its intense spirituality, that among its earliest ministers were found men so thoroughly imbued with the spirit of their great commission, that no ties of kindred or of nationality could restrict them to their native land, and who could not be satisfied without preaching the Gospel on the distant continents of the earth and the islands of the sea, notwithstanding that in their own country there were wide and inviting fields of Christian labour white unto the harvest, while the labourers were few.

We rejoice in the prosperity of your Missions, and pray that you may have yet more abundant success. "Thanks be unto God, which always causeth " you "to triumph in Christ, and maketh manifest the savour of His knowledge by " you " in every place." It is a source of hallowed joy to us, that while the vision of your faith sweeps the earth, and the feet of your messengers are swift to carry the message of grace afar, without abating your liberal contributions to the foreign work, you have addressed yourselves with exemplary earnestness to the establishment and support of llome Missions. The information given to us by your Delegates respecting your wisdom, zeal, and liberality in building churches was received with admiration and with gratitude to God for the grace He hath bestowed upon you. We cannot doubt that you will receive a rich reward in the eonversion to God of multitudes, who will increase your numbers and augment greatly your resources for further progress. Our prayers will ascend to God continually for His blessing upon this part of your work.

The interest with which we listened to the statements of your Delegates respecting your Mission in Italy was intense. For this extension of your Mission field we are especially grateful to God.

Nor do we fail to thank Him for the blessed harmony which prevails in your ministry and membership.

It was not without a painful sense of disappointment that we heard of the indisposition of the Rev. William Arthur, A.M., which prevented him from coming to us as your Representative. Ilis former visit to our country is remembered with unmingled pleasure. We longed to see him here again, to hear his voice, and to have the opportunity of expressing to him onr high esteem and warm affection. Then came another disappointment in the domestic affliction of the Rev. George T. Perks, A.M., who, though an entire stranger to us, was commended to our confidence and love by his selection as a Delegate from your hononred Body. We accept this opportunity of sending to him an assurance of our sympathy. But we were, nevertheless, highly favoured by the presence, and addresses, and preaching of those most excellent brethren who, by your appointment, and the will of God, appeared in their stead :---the Rev. Luke II. Wiseman, A.M., whose marked intelligence, manifest piety, chaste eloquence, and refined and noble bearing deeply impressed us, and secured for him at once a place in our hearts, and the Rev. William Morley Punshon, A.M., who had, by his previous intercourse and ministrations, secured our affections and our admiration. We were made glad by the coming of these brethren. They greatly refreshed our spirits.

Through the abundant grace of God the Father and our Lord Jesus Christ we continue to prosper. Our increase of members during the last four years has been two hundred and seventy-five thousand two hundred and forty-two. We have added to the number of our churches two thousand three hundred and nineteen, and seven hundred and thirty-nine to the number of our par-Our educational facilities have been greatly enlarged. sonages. God has put it into the hearts of some of our wealthy and honoured laymen to appropriate large portions of their wealth to this object. Meanwhile, though exposed to the special dangers which attend prosperity, we hold fast the doctrines so effectively taught by our fathers. And although some of these may not be made as much the subjects of argument as they once were, not being so frequently called in question, they are not less dear to The great doctrines of the divinity of Christ, of atonement for the sins of the whole world by the shedding of His precious blood, of justification by faith, of entire sanctification in this life, of the Divine authority of the Holy Scriptures and their sufficiency as a rule of faith and practice, are still written in the hearts of our ministry and membership. The enemy threatens us, at times, with a flood of worldliness; but the Spirit of the Lord enables us to lift high above the waves the standard of Scriptural holiness. Our ministers and members generally live righteously and die gloriously.

Our immense national domain, and rapidly increasing population, call upon us for the most energetic efforts of evangelization; and we are girding ourselves for another century of arduous toil and glorious recompense. "Brethren, pray for us, that the Word of the Lord may have free course, and be glorified" in every part of our land.

We are now in the midst of those changes in our ecclesiastical polity to which reference was made in our last Address to you.

They were not unanimously approved, but the minority, large as it is, have concluded, with remarkable unanimity, that the law which enjoins peace, and that we be of one heart and of onc mind, is of equal obligation with any law, or precedent, relating to forms of Church government.

They do not regard these as unimportant, and are not insensible to the responsibilities which they create; but, having entire confidence in the integrity of their brethren from whose views they dissent, they think it best to "put away all strife," except in the form of "striving together for the faith of the Gospel," leaving to honest experiment to settle questions which much argument has failed to settle. "And the very God of peace" has enabled us, in a notable manner, thus far to "forbear one another," to "put on charity," and to "let the peace of God rule in our hearts." We trust that the Spirit of truth will lead us into all truth on all important questions.

Since our last General Conference an unusual number of our eminent ministers have died. We mourn our loss, but exult in their gain. The heart of the Church has been deeply stirred by their rapid and comparatively sudden departure, and the question has been upon many lips,—Has God a controversy with us? We have reason to think that this startling dispensation has prepared the hearts of both ministers and members to receive spiritual blessings which might otherwise have been withheld. It has certainly prepared us to sympathize with you in similar bereavements. We greatly desire that the brotherly love which now unites us may continue and increase; and also, and especially, that whatever questions may arise between our national Governments may be settled by honourable diplomacy, so that the sad spectacle may never be seen of these two kindred powers engaged

in bloody conflict. "Now the God of peace, that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenant, make you perfect in every good work to do His will, working in you that which is wellpleasing in His sight, through Jesus Christ; to whom be glory for ever and ever. Amen."

We have appointed and commend to you as bearers of our Christian and brotherly salutations, the Rev. Bishop W. L. Harris, D.D., LL.D., and Rev. James A. M'Cauley, D.D.

ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA, 1874, TO THE BRITISH CONFERENCE, 1874.

REVEREND AND DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

WE heartily thank you for your kind, affectionate, and deeply interesting Address.

We acknowledge, with the warmest gratitude, the kindness with which you received our Representatives, and the generous and princely spirit in which you have complied with our request of last year for terminating our subordinate and depending relationship with you, and establishing that of fraternal independence with its duties and responsibilities. We enter upon those responsibilities with a deep sense of their importance, and with humble and devout dependence upon Divine strength and wisdom for their due fulfilment. And be assured, dear Fathers and Brethren, that never did a child grow up and go forth, by parental blessing and assistance, to the duties and pursuits of manhood, with more tender and grateful recollections of the parental household, than those which fill our hearts in regard to you when we assume the position and duties of an independent body.

During the twenty-six years of our filial relationship to you, our unity has been undisturbed, and our progress uninterrupted; our number of ministers has increased from a hundred and eighty to seven hundred and eighteen, and our number of Churchmembers from twenty-one thousand seven hundred and fortynine to seventy-six thousand four hundred and fifty-five; our annual Missionary contributions have advanced from ten thousand dollars to a hundred and eighteen thousand dollars; and there has been corresponding progress in the number and character of our houses of worship and our educational institutions, all the resources of Church strength and operation. The past year has witnessed a gratifying advance in every one of our Connexional funds, in all our educational institutions, and in every department of our work. We have been blessed in many places with gracious revivals of religion, so that we have a net increase of upwards of three thousand Church-members. \mathbf{The} year has been characterized by an increase of the Spirit of holiness, activity, and power among both preachers and people; and never were both more perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment, or animated by a more ardent and confident anticipation of still greater conquests and advancement in the future.

But while our official connexion with you is less intimate than heretofore, we assure you, Fathers and Brethren, never were we more completely one with you in heart, in Church unity, in aim, in labour; honouring you as our Mother Church, rejoicing with you in the success and prosperity of which you speak, and to which our Representatives to you bear cheering testimony, sympathizing with you in the widely extended work in which you are engaged, and praying that your successes and numbers may be a thousand times multiplied. We trust that you will still favour us, as you intimate, with frequent communications, addresses, and deputations.

The measures adopted last year, with a view to an organic union between the Methodists of the New Connexion in this country and ourselves, are approaching a satisfactory conclusion; and if the parent Conference of that Connexion act towards them in the same liberal and parental spirit that you have manifested towards us, the union of the two bodies will be accomplished here without any dismemberment, and apparently without a single individual secession on either side.

We are now met together as one Conference for the last time.

In the course of another day we shall cease to exist as one Conference, and become three Annual Conferences, with the addition of two more by our union with our Brethren of Eastern British America, and a general quadrennial representative Conference, which will meet for the first time next autumn, in the city of Toronto, being the supreme legislative body of a Church extending from the Atlantie to the Pacific shores, and embracing larger territorial dominion, with scareely less material resources, than the United States of America.

While we have so much cause of thankfulness and encouragement in the success of the past, and the prospects of the future, we have to mourn the loss of some, both of our senior and junior brethren, reminding us of the shortness and uncertainty of our term of labour, and of the importance of working with our might while it is called to-day. But our departed brethren have fallen,—every one at his post of labour,—leaving a life-example of fidelity, and a dying testimony of triumph.

Just fifty years have elapsed since our organization as a Canadian Conference, then containing thirty-one travelling and five superannuated preachers, with a membership of six thousand one hundred and fifty, with twenty-one small wooden houses of worship, now comprehending seven hundred and eighteen ministers, with a membership of seventy-six thousand four hundred and fifty-five, and upwards of eighteen hundred houses of worship and preaching-places; a large proportion of the churches being built of briek or stone, and commodious.

During our present session we have received into full connexion, and ordained to the full work of the ministry, twenty-three young men upon the expiration of their four years of successful probation; and have received thirty-nine young men on trial. One Church,—one in heart and purpose,—we now divide into several Annual Conferences, and go forth to our work, deeply sensible of the deficiencies as well as mercies of the past, but seeking for ourselves, personally, the full salvation of the Gospel, and renewing our consecration for its propagation.

Perfect harmony and true brotherly love have marked our deliberations; and the interest of our proceedings has been enlivened and increased by cheering communications from the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States, through its Representatives; and by two noble donations of ten thousand dollars each, towards the endowment of a Theological Chair in connection with our University; the one by the late Edward Jackson, Esq., of this city, and the other by his still surviving widow.

Very gracious Divine influences have crowned our deliberations and services; and we part to our appointed fields of labour, seeking a more than ever copious baptism of the Holy Spirit upon ourselves and our congregations, and devoting our all of heart, and strength, and life, to the one great work of spreading Scriptural holiness throughout the land; regarding the unprecedented material prosperity of our country, in which our people so largely share, as a ground of increased obligation and encouragement, to do all that in us lies to imbue the whole Dominion of Canada with the principles and spirit of a pure Christianity.

In the prosecution of this our Divine Mission, we are sure we shall have the co-operation of your sympathies and prayers, whilst we implore the richest outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon our parent Conference, and upon the work of our common Methodism throughout the world.

ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN EASTERN BRITISH AME-RICA, 1874, TO THE BRITISH CONFERENCE, 1874.

REV. AND VERY DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

THE emotions with which we approach you for the last time, in our relation as the affiliated Conference of Eastern British America, are too thrilling to allow effective utterance, or ever to be forgotten.

The communications of the Rev. H. Pickard, D.D., and Rev. C. Stewart, D.D., our Representatives in your last Conference, have greatly gladdened our hearts. The cordial welcome extended to them by your venerable Body we heartily appreciate; and your painstaking consideration of our interests is highly encouraging.

We have listened with deep interest to the Address with which you have been pleased to favour us. We thank you cordially for the renewed assurance of fraternity and good-will which it contains; and with pleasure we avail ourselves of the opportunity now afforded to us of conveying to you an expression of the respect and love we have ever cherished towards you, and of the satisfaction with which we have treasured up your affectionate and judicious counsels. We joy with you in the tokens of success with which the Head of the Church has crowned your labours in the interests of a soul-saving Christianity; and we pray for the souls committed to your watchful care, that their "love may abound yet more and more in knowledge and in all judgment; that they may approve things that are excellent; that they may be sincere and without offence till the day of Christ, being filled with the fruits of righteousness, which are by Jesus Christ unto the glory and praise of God."

We sympathize with you in the loss your Connexion has sustained during the past year by the death of many honoured Fathers and Brethren, who, having finished the work assigned them, have gone to receive the fulfilment of the Master's promise, "Where I am, there shall also My servant be." It is with chastened feelings we have received the tidings of the death of the late Dr. Scott, who, by his administrative ability, his courteous demeanour, his eminently appropriate pulpit ministrations, and his devout and hallowed spirit while among us, as President of our Conference, won our esteem and love; and who, from that period to the time of his death, continued to serve us as the Representative of our interests in your midst. Of him and of his services we shall ever cherish a most grateful recollection.

You will rejoice to know that in many parts of the wide field over which our labours extend, there have been gracious seasons of religious revival, some of which have not been equalled in the history of our Conference. As the result, we are able to report a net increase of one thousand six hundred and forty-six members, with three thousand three hundred and thirty on trial.

In our Connexional funds there has been generally a gratifying increase, especially in that of our Home Missions, which is two thousand two hundred and twenty dollars in advance of last year. There is still much spiritual destitution among our home population. Appeals for ministerial supply are continually reaching us; and to these our people, by their liberal support of our Home-Mission movement, are enabling us in some measure to respond. We regret that the amount raised for Foreign Missions is in arrears of that of former years. This, doubtless, has arisen from the fact of the largely-increased contributions to our Home work. Nevertheless, the cause of Foreign Missions is dear to our people's hearts; and their carnest desire and prayer to God is for the salvation of those who still live amid the darkness and desolations of heathendom.

Events of recent occurrence have served to deepen the impression we have long entertained as to the important relations which our Educational Institutions sustain towards the general prosperity of the work of God in these Provinces; and we rejoice to inform you that these Institutions, despite opposing influences, have been during the past year more largely patronized than ever before, and their prospects of usefulness are in the highest degree encouraging. The Endowment Fund, which last year amounted to forty thousand dollars, has this year, through the indefatigable labours of Dr. Pickard and the liberality of our people, reached the sum of fifty thousand dollars; and we have reason to believe that erelong it will be so augmented as to place these establishments in a position of independence and more successful operation. The labours of our beloved brother, the Rev. Charles Stewart, D.D., as Theological Professor during the past year, have been in the highest degree acceptable. Ten of the candidates for our ministry have this year been permitted to attend our Institutions at Sackville, N.B.

Under the able management of the Rev. A. W Nicolson, our Editor and Book-Steward, the "Provincial Wesleyan," our Conference organ, still maintains its efficiency, and is acquiring more extended circulation. Our Book-Room, you will be pleased to learn, has so far improved in its financial condition, that it is now free from the burden of debt, which for so many years crippled its operations, and is, to a larger extent than ever, instrumental in diffusing our Methodistic literature throughout the land.

Thirteen promising young brethren, having honourably completed their probation, and by gifts, graces, and fruits having given proof of a Divine call to the duties of the Christian pastorate, have this year been cordially admitted into full connexion with us, and solemnly set apart to their great work by ordination; while twenty-nine have been received as candidates for the same sacred office.

Two of our aged brethren, the Rev. G. M. Barratt and the Rev. Richard Weddall, are obliged to ask for a Supernumerary relation. These honoured senior members of our Conference, who have been laborious, exemplary, and useful for a long series of years, we commend to your undiminished affection, as only infirmity, the inevitable consequence of the rush of years, compels them to seek such a relation.

Several of our young brethren have obtained permission to desist wholly or in part from Circuit work this year, in order that they may thereby regain their wonted strength to labour in the future.

Through the sparing mercy of God, our death-roll this year is brief. One aged minister, the Rev. Thomas Smith, has passed from the militant to the triumphant Church. He was a good man. The Gospel which he had preached to others he found to be the power of God in sustaining and comforting him amid the last struggles of expiring nature.

We have been favoured with a deputation from the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church of the United States of America, consisting of the Rev. W. R. Clark, D.D., and the Rev. William Elliott. These honoured ministers of the Lord Jesus have delighted us by their able and richly evangelical ministrations in the pulpit, and we have been encouraged and profited by their counsels and admonitions on the Conference platform; while their narrations of the struggles, the progress, and glorious triumples of our common Christianity in that vast country have tended to strengthen our confidence in our own ecclesiastical system, as being adapted to meet the spiritual necessities of this Dominion.

Our Conference session has been one of great harmony, and all our discussions and deliberations have been marked by manifestations of brotherly confidence and affection, and by great unanimity in the conclusions to which they have led.

It is not without feelings approaching those of sadness that we now terminate the correspondence in our affiliated relation, which, under such happy auspices nineteen years ago, it was our privilege to initiate. In adverting to our former connection with you, we cannot refrain from giving emphatic expression to our fervent gratitude for the many favours you have conferred upon us through the agency of your noble Missionary Society. And we shall ever hold in endeared recollection the valuable services rendered to the cause of Christ among us by the agency of that honoured institution for the diffusion of the light of Divine truth in these Colonies.

Yet, though it affords us much satisfaction to give expression to our gratitude for the fostering care and generous support which have been accorded to us by you in the past, we may reiterate our opinion, that the time has arrived when the work of God among us in this Dominion should be placed upon a more comprehensive and commanding basis. We are pleased to be able to inform you that our Societies have adopted almost unanimously the scheme of union with the Conference of Canada.

And now, dear and honoured Fathers and Brethren, on this occasion—so momentous to us and the numerous Societies and congregations over which we have the pastoral supervision, standing upon the threshold of our new career, solicitous that it may issue in the increased glory of God, and in the salvation of immortal souls—allow us to assure you of our profound attachment to all that is distinctive in the doctrines and the effective polity of our common Methodism. Our prayer is, that we may ever be one with you in the sublime and godlike purpose of "spreading Scriptural holiness throughout the world."

We ask, and shall ever feel ourselves highly favoured, to be remembered by you in your entreaties at the throne of grace. Bear us up, Fathers and Brethren, before the mercy-seat of God in "the effectual fervent prayer" that "availeth much," 1874.

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that we may be fitted for the duties and responsibilities that lie before us in the future.

RESOLUTIONS IN RELATION TO UNION, TRANSMITTED BY ORDER OF THE CONFERENCE OF EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA.

WHEREAS the preliminary arrangements for the intended union of the Conference of Canada and Eastern British America with altered relations to the British Conference are now completed,

And whereas this is the last opportunity which, in the present relation to each other, we shall have of expressing our regard for the Fathers and Brethren of the British Conference, and our sense of the obligations under which we are laid by the kind consideration we have ever received at their hands, it is resolved,-

1. That we gratefully record the fact, that before and since the organization of the Conference of Eastern British America in 1855, down to the present time, we have been most affectionately regarded by our Fathers and Brethren in the British Conference, and by the Missionary Committee, as evinced not only by the loving and encouraging words which they have sent us from time to time, but by the substantial aid they have continually and so readily granted us in the prosecution of our work.

2. That we heartily appreciate the cordial reception given to our Representatives at the last meeting of the British Conference, and the generous treatment of our proposals to change our relation to that Body, by entering into a union with the Canada Conference, involving an independent Canadian organization, and also the resolutions on the subject of this union passed by the British Conference, together with their cheerful consent to assist for some time the work of our Missions in Newfoundland, Bermuda, and Labrador.

3. That we sincerely reciprocate the good wishes expressed in the above-named Resolutions, and do earnestly pray that upon our Fathers and Brethren of the British Conference the prospering blessing of God may ever abide, and that Methodism in the old country, in the Dominion of Canada, and wherever she may now or hereafter exist, may be true to the mission to which God has called her, and which our fathers so zealously fulfilled, of spreading Scriptural holiness throughout the land.

ADDRESS OF THE BRITISH CONFERENCE, 1874, TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN THE DOMINION OF CANADA.

DEAR BRETHREN,

WE greet you in the name of the Lord. "Grace be unto you, and peace, from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ."

Our affection for you, dear brethren, and our interest in the work of God committed to you, are none the less because we address you in a new relationship. You are now to us the Representatives of the two Connexions with which it has been our joy through many years to hold official communications; and we do not forget that your Conference represents also a branch of the Methodist family, whose union with the two previously existing Bodies now comprehended in your Connexion, has been consummated to the satisfaction of all the contracting parties. "Our hearts' desire and prayer to God" is, that the Church which is formed by this union may be the home of unbroken brotherly love, and may be the medium of eminent displays of the saving "power from on high."

We need not remind you, however, that all Church-organization is but a means to an end. We rejoice, therefore, that the brethren who met in Conference at Hamilton, and whose Address we received with great satisfaction, were able to assure us of their unswerving determination to hold fast, and to hold forth, the great doctrines of the Gospel which God used so mightily in the preaching of our fathers. In thus addressing us we doubt not that they may be taken to represent the other brethren of your Conference. To us this is an unspeakable comfort. We value far more highly the substance of a Church's teaching than the form of a Church's administration. This latter must necessarily be adapted to meet the needs of different nations, varying social conditions, and successive ages; always having regard to But the faith of well-recognised and essential principles. Christ's Church is "the faith once delivered to the saints." In it is the truth needed by, and sufficient for, all lands and all time. And we rejoice that while we shall continue to cry aloud to the dying world, the voice of your Church will be heard uttering in harmonious tones the self-same testimony. The orthodoxy

of any Church, however, depends more on its spiritual life, than even on its regulations, or its formularies. We do not undervalue these latter. But where vital godliness does not flourish imongst a people, neither discipline nor creeds will preserve its nembers from deadly errors of practice and of faith. We are hankful, therefore, to hear that the work of God is prospering within your borders. Methodist Churches live most happily, and grow most surely, in the genial atmosphere of an intelligent and sound revival. May the cry of broken hearts and the shout of hearts made new never be wanting in your borders, till the earth be filled with righteousness !

We are glad to know that you are able to commence a Mission to the Heathen beyond the boundaries of your vast territory. We mark with affectionate interest the commencement of your operations in Japan, and shall follow your brethren in that new field with our sympathy and prayers. Our experience convinces us that you will not be less strong for any good work at home, because of your efforts to extend the Gospel abroad. In this sense also "there is that scattereth, and yet increaseth; and there is that withholdeth more than is meet, but it tendeth to poverty."

We are holding our Conference in Cornwall, a county which has been the scene of extraordinary Gospel triumphs from the earliest days of Methodism. Our session has been made memorable not only by the great public interest which it has excited, and the warmth of affection exhibited by the people of the county, but by the great spiritual power which has attended most of the public services. It will have gratified you to know that our President is the Rev. William Morley Punshon, LL.D., whose lengthened residence and great labours in "the Dominion" endeared him to you all, and who has always been to us, whether present or absent, a brother beloved. The interest of our session has been further increased by the presence with us of honoured brethren from our affiliated Conferences, and from the Mission-field; and especially by the presence and addresses of Bishop Harris and Dr. M'Cauley, who brought to us the fraternal salutations of our brethren in the United States. We hope that in future years we may have—at least, occasionally the pleasure of welcoming brethren deputed from your Conference who shall bring to us tidings of your prosperity.

The review of our work has discovered cause for devout thankfulness to Almighty God. Our material prosperity advances without check. The work of chapel erection proceeds at a rate increasing year by year.

There is an addition of several thousands to the number of scholars attending our daily Schools, with a still larger increase in the number of our Sunday-scholars, and we are looking for a still further enlargement and consolidation of our Sunday-school work, by means of a Connexional Sunday-School Union which we have determined to establish. Moreover, we are endeavouring to supply the missing links in the chain of our Educational agencies. On the one hand, the work of reclaiming and uplifting the orphan and deserted children of our land (a work to the success of which your valued eo-operation has largely contributed) is attended with a manifest blessing. On the other hand, we have determined to establish a High School in close neighbourhood to the University of Cambridge, ---where the sons of our most intelligent people may receive an education which will fit them for the highest positions in commercial and profes-Thus we are striving to bring the youth of all sional life. classes under the penetrating and purifying influence of a godly education. Meantime, our Home-Missionary efforts are not relaxed, and our Foreign Missionary income is larger by several thousands of pounds than in any previous year. But the best of all is, God has been with us in the preaching of the Word; and we report an increase in the membership of our Churches of three thousand souls. Though this is not commensurate with our desires and hopes, we accept it as a proof that the Lord is still with us, and as a challenge from Him to bring to His service a more impassioned zeal, and a more complete devotion, so that He may "open the windows of heaven, and pour us out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to contain it."

We have deputed as our Representative to your Conference the Rev. Gervase Smith, M.A., the honoured Secretary of our Conference, who enjoys the confidence and affection of our Churches. He will inform you in detail of the progress of the Lord's work amongst us, and we are sure that you will give to him a hearty welcome.

And now, brethren, farewell. May you "be strong in the Lord, and in the power of Ilis might"! And as your great Dominion develops its population, and opens up its territories. may you be always equal to the calls of the moment, and be able to spread over the whole extent of the vast region embraced within your boundaries the knowledge of that salvation which alone can make any people really prosperous and truly great. and to take your full part in the evangelization of the whole world !

CORRESPONDENCE WITH THE CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH, SOUTH, UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

IN accordance with the Resolution of the Conference of 1873, (see *Minutes*, p. 193 of this Volume,) the following Letter was sent to the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, which met at Louisville, Kentucky, in May, 1874 :---

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,

HAVING learned that your General Conference is to meet before our next annual Assembly, we have resolved to address to you our fraternal greetings.

In so doing we cannot overlook the fact, that so many years have elapsed since the commencement of your separate existence as a Church without our having sought intercommunion with you. The causes existing at the time, from which this arose, have now passed away. As to the institution of slavery in general, and in particular as to the forms in which it formerly existed in our own Colonies, and in your country, our opinions remain the same as they ever were, and as they have often been deliberately expressed. This fact makes us deeply grateful that at length in your country, as in our own Empire, the evil has been entirely, and as we devoutly trust, finally, done away. It is to us a cause of thankfulness that nothing exists to prevent official intercourse between your General Conference and our own. And we pray that both Churches, and both countries, may bc firmly united, within themselves by concord, and to one another by amity.

We believe that you with us firmly hold the great Christian truths, which we have both in common, and that you are striving to spread living religion among your own people. For ourselves we trust that we have not eeased to "hold fast the form of sound words" which has been handed down to us. In the presence of a subtle sceptieism on the one hand, and of an increasingly audacious sacerdotalism on the other, it is our duty, and, we trust, it is our endeavour, to "earnestly contend for the faith once delivered unto the saints." Our country is being blessed, at this time, with unwonted visitations of the Divine Spirit; slumbering Churches have been aroused; apathy has been rebuked, and we live in expectation of yet better days.

We are thankful to be able to report to you that our own Churches are in a state of general tranquillity, and are not without signs of spiritual prosperity. The number of members meeting in class has not increased rapidly during the last few years, and the almost stationary character of the returns has been to us a cause of anxiety.

On the other hand, our congregations and schools have been steadily increasing; the amount of money raised for the purpose of erecting new and more commodious places of worship has been

beyond all former precedent; Home Missions and Day-School education have also been extended, and the cause of Foreign Missions receives increasing support. Our three Theological Colleges are filled with a fairly adequate supply of approved Candidates for the Ministry; our Colleges for the training of schoolmasters and mistresses, and our other Connexional Educational Institutions, yield us, upon the whole, great satisfaction. Beyond these islands the work has spread with a rapidity commensurate with the growth of the British Colonies. Since we last communicated with you, an affiliated Conference has been formed in Australia, which is now currying forward evangelical work, with vigour and success, on that continent, and in various groups of islands in Polynesia; a Conference has been formed in France and Switzerland; while, by a friendly arrangement just coneluded, the Canada Conference, hitherto affiliated to our own, has become financially and ecclesiastically independent. For the present we find it best to continue together as one Conference in Great Britain. The last returns showed that there were (without including Ireland, but including Foreign Missions) one thousand seven hundred and forty-four Ordained Ministers, and three hundred and fourteen Probationers, in connexion with the British Conference, and four hundred and twenty-two thousand one hundred and seventy-one Church-members, besides twenty-eight thousand two hundred and twenty-eight on trial for membership. The other Methodist Bodies in England are, in proportion to the Parent Body, much more considerable than is the ease in your country With these, although we do not see our way to organized union, our relations are of an increasingly friendly character; indeed, towards all who hold the Head, even Christ, it is our desire, as we are persuaded it is yours, to manifest always the kind and catholic spirit of primitive Methodism. Our enemies are not our Christian brethren, but sin and the powers of darkness.

And now, beloved and honoured brethren, we beg that yea will accept this our salutation in the Lord. We pray that the Great Master may be present with you, throughout the session of your General Conference, that your Churches may be blessed with an increase of holiness, and enlarged through the conversion of multitudes of sinners; that the children of your people may follow in the steps of their godly fathers; that a succession of faithful men may continue to be raised up among you who shall not "cease to teach and preach Jesus Christ." We shall rejoice to hear of your welfare, and to receive, either by deputation or otherwise, information as to your affairs.

TO THE WESLEYAN-METHODIST CONFERENCE OF GREAT BRITAIN.

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN IN CHRIST,

YOUR kind and Christian Letter of fraternal greeting has been received by us, through our venerable Bishop Paine, with great satisfaction, and we respond to it in the same spirit of Christian candour and kindness as that in which it is expressed.

It has always been the desire of our Church to maintain cordial Christian relations with all bodies of believers who are essentially one in the common faith, and close fraternal relations with every branch of the great family of Methodism, of whatever distinctive But being aware of the light in which the heated denunname. ciations of sectional prejudice and misunderstood surroundings have caused us to be viewed, we have not judged it becoming in us to seek the recognition and fellowship of Christian bodies, and so have calmly waited for time to soften asperities of feeling, remove the clouds of prejudice, by correcting errors of the public mind, and with calmer thought to do us justice. We do not now propose to even state the grounds of our former or present position, or attempt any defence. Our Church has made its record, which is open to the world, and we trust to impartial history, in calmer times, to fully vindicate our course.

Believing that ecclesiastically we have occupied no ground which is not strictly Scriptural, or different from that occupied by the venerable Founder of Methodism and the other great bodies of the Wesleyan family, we have not been able to see why your venerable Body has failed to recognise us hitherto. But we rejoice to know that an era of clearer views has dawned, and we sincerely pray that nothing may occur to overshadow it for a moment, and that the fraternal intercourse thus auspiciously begun may ripen into the firmest and purest bonds of Christian brotherhood and co-operation.

It affords us great joy at all times to know your fidelity and devotion to the faith of Christ, your success in winning souls, and the godly example furnished by your Church to the world; and, above all, your grand Missionary work—the praise of which is throughout the Christian world. In all these things we would follow in your footsteps. Our Missionary work, as well as our home operations, has been greatly retarded by the calamities through which our country has passed within the last few years, from which our section suffered most severely.

The great difference in the structure and condition of society in our new and, in many sections, sparsely populated country, as compared with yours, is unfavourable to that compactness and organic completeness in our Church that have been attained by yours; but in the six hundred and fifty thousand members who compose our Body there are multitudes who fear God and serve with fidelity our common Master.

We rejoice to be able to say that we are not without manifest tokens of the Divine favour among us. Tens of thousands are added to our communion annually, by profession of faith in Christ; and, to the praise of Divine grace be it said, we have from the beginning enjoyed peace and unity throughout our Body to a remarkable degree. Our ministry is little given to vain and dangerous speculations, and our people are not easily moved from the faith of the Gospel; and though surrounded by the same form of pretentions scepticism and arrogant sacerdotalism that lead so many astray in your country, we carnestly strive to maintain "the form of sound words" received through the ministrations of the venerable Wesley, whose name is held in the highest reverence among us.

We have not been unmindful of our duty to our youth and to posterity, and are exerting ourselves to furnish our people, and as many outside of our pale as we can reach, with the means of education, under the fostering care of the Church and sanctions of religion. Besides numerous High-Schools and academies, we have seven Colleges, in which some one thousand six hundred youths and young men are pursuing a classical and scientific course. Of those, about 180 are licensed preachers, or have the ministry in yiew as their life-work. And we are just now engaged in measures for the establishment of a University upon a broad scale, for which we have secured more than six hundred thousand dollars.

The cause of Sunday-schools and the religious training of the young is receiving increased attention among us; a profound conviction is taking hold upon the minds of our people, that we must *train* the young in the way we would have them go in later life.

And now, Christian brethren, we send you our fraternal greeting in the Lord. You have our earnest prayers that you may greatly increase in numbers, and abound in every grace that constitutes a holy people, and mighty in the Lord, that the beauty of the Lord your God may be upon you, and that He may fully establish the work of your hands

We shall rejoice to hear of your prosperity, and to receive messengers from you at all times.

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MEETING OF THE MISSIONARY COMMITTEE OF REVIEW,

HELD IN CAMBORNE, JULY 28TH, 1874.

MOVED by the Rev. Dr. Jobson; seconded by Mr. T. P. Bunting; supported by Mr. C. R. Rippon, Manchester:

1. That this Committee cannot listen to the record of the death of its late lamented Treasurer without expressing its sense of the value of the services which Mr. Heald, during a protracted life, was enabled to render to the Society, and of the loss which it has sustained by his decease. The Committee would "glorify God in him," and would cherish the prayerful hope that men like-minded may continue to be raised up, whose chief care it shall be to advance the interests of the kingdom of Christ.

Moved by the Rev. Charles Garrett; seconded by Mr. H. J. Atkinson; supported by Bishop Harris, of the Methodist Episcopal Church: 2. That this Committee of Review has heard with much satisfaction of the amount of the Annual Income, and especially of the increase in the regular contributions in the Home Districts. But it is persuaded that from the constantly increasing congregations a much larger increase is possible, and would strongly urge the desirableness of a more thorough and perfect system of collecting annual and other subscriptions in aid of the Society's funds.

Moved by the Rev. E. E. Jenkins, M.A.; seconded by Mr. Alderman Davies, of Salford; supported by the Rev. George Piercy, and the Rev. Oliver M'Cutcheon:

3. That the need for Missionary effort which still exists in various parts of the world,—the claims of India and China, where our agency is as nothing in comparison of the vastness of the population,—the necessities of Africa, both in the South and West, where the Society has old-established Missions, and in those central regions which have recently been opened up, the wants of Southern Europe, and of various other parts of the world,—constitute a call upon our friends to increase their efforts for the propagation of the Gospel in the regions beyond.

Moved by the Rev. Dr. James; seconded by the Rev T. B. Stephenson, B.A.; supported by Mr. Joseph Ryder, of Cambridge:

4. That this Committee recommends that the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. Dr. Jobson, the General Treasurer, to the General Secretaries, and to the Committee of Management, for their services to the Society during the past year

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE NEW KINGSWOOD AND WOODHOUSE GROVE SCHOOLS AND EDUCATION FUND,

HELD IN CAMBORNE, JULY 24rn, 1874.

PRESENT, the REV G. T. PERKS, M.A., President of the Conference, in the Chair; the Rev. Gervase Smith, M.A., Secretary of the Conference; the Rev. Benjamin B. Waddy, Treasurer of the Fund; the Rev. Frederick Payne and the Rev. John Harvard, Secretaries of the Fund; the Rev G. Stringer Rowe and the Rev. Henry J. Pope, Treasurer and Secretary of the Children's Fund, and others.

It was reported that the number of Ministers' children upon

the Fund in the past year has been 694; 250 boys in the Schools, 138 girls in the Schools, and 306 boys and girls receiving education allowances at home. The cost has been £18,100 6s. 11d.; and the deficiency provided for by the Children's Fund has been £4,779 10s. 2d. This is £203 2s. 0d. less than the deficiency of last year.

Again the examinations at the boys' Schools have been conducted, for the most part, under the auspices of the Syndicate of the University of Cambridge, and the result is on the whole highly satisfactory. It will be seen from the Committee's Rcports that the health of the Schools is good, and that discipline has been well maintained. The religious state of all the Schools is highly encouraging.

It was unanimously resolved, That this Committee requests the Conference to appoint five Trustees to invest moneys left by Mr. Fernley and Mr. Gabriel, and others, and to prepare a deed in conformity with the specific instructions of the respective wills.

It was also unanimously resolved to recommend that the thanks of the Conference be given :---

1. To the Rev. Benjamin B. Waddy and Mr. John Meek, the General Treasurers; the Rev. Frederick Payne and the Rev. John Harvard, the General Secretaries; and to the Local Treasurers, Secretaries, and Committees, for the diligent and efficient discharge of the duties of their respective offices during the year.

2. To the Rev. Henry H. Chettle and the Rev. John H. Lord, the Governors of the Schools, and to Mrs. Chettle and Mrs. Lord, together with the ladies having charge of the Schools for girls, at Clapton and Southport, for their kind attention to the comfort of the children under their care during the past year.

3. To the ladics and gentlemen who, at the request of the Local Committees, have kindly served the Institutions by examining the Schools for both boys and girls in various branches of learning.

A conversation took place on the reading of the Report of the Special Committee appointed to consider the subject of Improvements in the Management of New Kingswood and Woodhouse Grove Schools, (see *Minutes*, 1873, pp. 151, 152 of this Volume,) and a Resolution was passed, approving of the proposed concentration of the system of education in the two Schools.

MEETING OF THE COMMITTEE OF REVIEW ON CHAPEL AFFAIRS,

HELD IN CAMBORNE, JULY 27TH, 1874.

PRESENT, the REV. GEORGE T. PERKS, M.A., President of the Conference, in the Chair; the Rev. Gervase Smith, M.A., Secretary of the Conference; the Rev. Messrs. W Edwards and Edwin II. Tindall, Secretaries of the Chapel Committee; the Rev. Messrs. John Bedford, William Arthur, M.A., John Farrar, Dr. W W Stamp, Charles Prest, John Rattenbury, and others.

Also, Mr. Samuel R. Healey, one of the Treasurers of the General Chapel Fund, Sir Francis Lycett, Messrs. John Napier, William Mewburn, Nieholas Downing, John Berrie, C. W Rippon, James S. Sutcliffe, Isaac Hoyle, and others.

The Rev W Edwards read the Report for the year 1873-4, of which the following is an Abstract :---

The Income from all Sources is $\pm 8,971$ 19s. 8d., being an increase from ordinary sources of $\pounds 461$ 4s. 10d.

The Committee have received from the Executors of the late Mr. John Fernley his legacy of $\pounds 20,000$; also, $\pounds 125$ from the Representatives of the late Miss Mary Jane Grant.

The Subscriptions and Collections for the "North Wales Chapel Fund" amount to £591 7s. 11d., being an increase on the year of £1 2s. 1d.

The Subscriptions and Collections for the "South Wales Chapel Fund" amount to £29–14s. 10d.

I. BUILDING DEPARTMENT.

Erections sanctioned.

129 Chapels, at an estimated cost of £214,955; 9 Ministers houses, £4,900; 21 School Rooms, £11,959; 81 Enlargements and Alterations, £40,409; 104 Modifications. £55,790; 41 Organs, £9,022, have been sanctioned by the Committee. This is an increase of 23 cases over the previous year; and an increase of £20,422 in the proposed outlay, being by that amount the largest outlay sanctioned by the Committee in any one year. The temporary debt sanctioned is £55,283, being $16\frac{2}{3}$ per cent. The aid promised by the Committee to new Chapels is, in Grants, £4,210; in Loans, £13,960.

Sales.

The Committee have sanctioned the sale of 32 Chapels, 6 Schools, 8 Ministers' houses, 10 cottages, and 10 plots of land. 31 Chapels, 6 Schools, and 4 Ministers' houses, are to be superseded by more commodious erections.

Erections completed.

In the following cases the conditions agreed upon with the Committee have been observed :—94 Chapels, costing £179,062; 16 Ministers' houses, £10,814; 24 School Rooms, £16,116; 68 Enlargements, etc., £38,242; 37 Organs, £9,080. In 54 cases the debt is larger than the amount allowed by £6,855.

There are also 18 cases for which Connexional sanction was not sought, and on which the per-centage of debt is $44\frac{3}{10}$. The entire outlay, £10,347 These cases are fewer than last year by 6. During the year the Committee have paid towards new Chapels,—Grants, £3,470; Loans, £4,060.

II. RELIEF DEPARTMENT.

Grants.

To the Trustees of 82 Chapels $\pm 3,528$ have been paid. On 50 of these no debt now remains.

Loans.

The Loan instalments received during the year, have amounted to £8,720 4s. 9d. on the *Relief* account, and £2,485 5s. on the *Erections'-Fund* account. The Loans now in operation are 487 £9,195 have been advanced to meet £11,949 raised by Trustees. The South Wales Loan Committee have advanced £275 to meet the same amount raised by Trustees; and the North Wales Committee have advanced £945 in Loans.

III. LOCAL EFFORTS.

The sums paid off by local efforts and surplus income are $\pounds 28,023$ 15s. 10d., or $\pounds 2,989$ 7s. 7d. more than last year, and $\pounds 620$ 7s. 7d. above any previous year.

Contributions to Circuit Funds.

2,601 Trusts have contributed £31,065 14s. 7d., being an increase of 131 Trusts, and £2,974 0s. 11d. in contributions.

IV. SUMMARY.

The total amount of debts discharged is £72,993, making \pounds 1,018,879 in the last 20 years.

The total sum contributed in Great Britain, in the last year, as far as ascertained, is $\pounds 321,868$, an increase of $\pounds 79,839$ on the year.

V. GENERAL MANAGEMENT OF TRUST ESTATES.

The returns include particulars relating to 6,369 Trust Estates. There is an increase of 562 in the number insured against fire. There is a gratifying increase of about 200 Trusts entirely free from debt.

VI. LEGAL AFFAIRS.

The Board of Charity Commissioners have continued to render very valuable aid in various matters affecting Wesleyan Trusts, especially in their renewal, when, owing to various eircumstances, difficulties are found in effecting all that is needed by Deed in the usual manner. The Committee would remind Superintendents and Trustees of the importance, in all applications to the Board, of observing the rule printed in the Minutes of Conference for 1866, respecting the approval of the Committee and the signature of the President.

ACCOMMODATION IN WESLEYAN PLACES OF WORSHIP.

According to the returns made to the Committee during the year, it appears that there are 7,486 Wesleyan-Methodist Chapels and other preaching-places in Great Britain, affording accommodation for 1,723,980 hearers.

The following Resolutions were adopted :---

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Moved by the Rev. Dr. Osborn; and seconded by Mr. W W. Pocock:

1 That this Meeting rejoices in the large increase of the ordinary income of the Chapel Fund, in the number and character of the cases completed during the year, in the gradual diminution of irregular cases, in the large reduction of Chapel debts, and in the general prosperity attending our Chapel affairs.

Moved by the Rev. Joseph Hargreaves; seconded by Mr. William Hinson:

2. That this Meeting, on reviewing the work of this Department during the past twenty years, is gratified with the steady growth with which it has been distinguished, as well as with the large extent of the operations carried out within that period, and expresses devout thankfulness to Almighty God for the great measure of success with which it has pleased Him thus to bless the efforts and liberality of His people. 1874.

Moved by the Rev. William Arthur, M.A.; seconded by Mr. William Mewburn:

3. That this Meeting feels considerable satisfaction at the Returns giving the accommodation provided in Wesleyan-Methodist Places of Worship, and is gratified with the increase shown upon the Returns of 1851; but is still of opinion that much remains to be done in order to meet the spiritual necessities of the population in the large towns and rural districts of our land.

Moved by Mr. T. Percival Bunting; seconded by Mr. John B. Reynolds:

4. That the thanks of this Meeting be presented to the District Chapel Secretaries and Committees, to the Circuit Chapel Secretaries, and to the Ministers and Trustees who have acted with them, for their valuable services to this Department of Methodism.

Moved by the Rev. Wallace M'Mullen; seconded by Mr. George H. Chubb:

5. That the thanks of this Meeting be presented to Messrs. Healey and Haworth, the Treasurers; to the Rev. Messrs. Edwards and Tindall, the General Secretaries; to the Rev. John Bedford, Secretary of the Board of Trustees for Chapel Purposes; and to the Committee, for their diligent and faithful services.

The Lay Members of the General Committee were nominated for the next year.

The Rev. Marmaduke C. Osborn read the Report of the Committee appointed to consider the subject of the Extension of Methodism in Great Britain.

METROPOLITAN WESLEYAN CHAPEL BUILDING FUND.

THE Secretary read the following Statement :---

Four Metropolitan Chapels have been erected and opened during the year, and another will be dedicated to God within the next few weeks. Only one site has been actually secured during the year; but negotiations for the purchase of three other sites are now going on. In addition to these, sixteen sites have been secured by loans previously made, on some of which temporary Chapels have been erected; so that about twenty sites are now, or will speedily be, available for commodious Metropolitan 514

year, towards which grants have been made from the Special Fund of £8,000, and £1,000 from the Ordinary Fund: and loans to the extent of £3,000. Repayments from sixteen trusts. amounting to £1,336 10s., have been made during the year. Amount of collections, donations, and subscriptions, £1,520 8s. 4d. Total income, £2,959 19s. 1d., an increase of £124 13s. 3d. Number of Members of Society, at the last March visitation. in connection with the Chapels which have been built by the aid of the Fund, seven thousand one hundred and eighty-two. The Metropolitan Chapel Fund received its first sanction by the Conference held in Cornwall twelve years ago, so that some of the general results of the efforts put forth may here be stated:-Number of Chapels erected, including two small School Rooms and two Enlargements, forty-two; number of sittings provided, thirty-eight thousand two hundred and eight; amount of loans, $\pounds 33, 195$; amount of grants, $\pounds 23, 725$; actual cost (say) $\pounds 243,000$. Of the $\pounds 33,195$ which has been loaned on sites and erections, £8,831 10s. has been already repaid, so that $\pm 24,363$ 10s. has yet to be repaid. In addition to the forty-two commodious Chapels which the Fund has assisted to build during the last twelve years, seventy smaller places of worship, including School Rooms, iron Chapels, Halls, etc., have been built or hired independently of the Fund, providing fifteen thousand six hundred , and thirty-four sittings, so that increased accommodation for fifty-three thousand eight hundred and forty-two persons has been secured. When the Fund was established, about thirtynine thousand sittings were provided within the Metropolitan The present provision for London may therefore be districts. stated at ninety-two thousand eight hundred and forty-two sittings. The Committee are deeply impressed with the importance of increased effort. We aim at five new Chapels per year: but the income scarcely provides the ordinary help for three. Either the Fund must be largely increased, or our work in London must be greatly crippled. The Committee earnestly asks the sympathy and help of this Meeting and the Conference.

The following Resolutions were adopted :--

Moved by the Rev. Dr. Punshon ; seconded by the Rev. L. H. Wiseman, M.A.; supported by Mr. Barlow:

1. That this Meeting heartily rejoices in the steady progress made during the year, and devoutly acknowledges the Divine blessing which has attended the operations of the Fund from the beginning ; but, in view of the vast and urgent spiritual necessities of London, earnestly requests the Conference to repeat its recommendation that increased help be given to this Fund, not only by occasional Donations, but also by Annual Subscriptions and Collections in each Metropolitan Circuit.

Moved by the Rev. George Scott (B); seconded by Mr. John B. Reynolds; supported by Mr. Arthur Smith:

2. That the thanks of this Meeting be given to Sir F. Lycett, and W. M'Arthur, Esq., M.P., the Treasurers; to the Rev. Gervase Smith, M.A., Secretary of the Conference, General Secretary; to the Rev. John A. Armstrong, and Mr. S. D. Waddy, Q.C., M.P., Secretaries, for their faithful and efficient services during the year.

MEETING OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE HOME-MISSION AND CONTINGENT FUND.

The Report of the Committee of Management was read, including its recommendations on the two subjects which had been specially remitted to it by the Conference of 1873 :--

L.-THE SUSTENTATION OF THE MINISTRY.

After carefully considering the Returns furnished by the various District Meetings, and the views expressed by those Meetings, the Committee unanimously adopted the following Resolutions, viz: :--

1. That this Committee hears with satisfaction of the efforts which are now in progress in some parts of the Connexion to raise the allowances of Ministers, whether as assisted by the Home Mission and Contingent Fund, or entirely dependent upon District local funds.

2. That it earnestly desires that such efforts may be carried on until the Circuits shall have raised the allowances to an amount which shall satisfy the requirements of the several District Meetings respectively.

3. That this Committee requests the Conference to recommend that the surplus of the Sustentation Fund in each District be remitted to the General Treasurer of the Home Mission and Contingent Fund; it being understood that such surplus be carried to a separate account, and appropriated to similar objects in other and more necessitous Districts.

4. That the Committees for promoting the augmentation of allowances in the Districts respectively, shall be appointed at the Financial District Meetings wherever practicable.

II.-- VILLAGE METHODISM.

On this subject the Committee adopted the following Resolutions, viz. :---

I. On considering the information supplied from different Districts, the Committee is satisfied that, in order to the support and extension of Methodism in the rural parts of the country, the number of Ministers must be considerably increased.

(1.) In many cases, in which additional ministerial labour may be provided, the present arrangement of Circuits might be continued, but the additional Minister might be appointed to reside in some central village, and bestow special attention on the villages in the neighbourhood.

(2.) The Committee further considers, that in many parts of the country Village-Circuits might be formed with advantage, several adjacent villages being grouped together, so as to secure to the Societies and congregations in them concentrated pastoral attention, now so urgently needed.

(3.) The Committee is of opinion that a few Ministers, whose gifts and zeal specially qualify them for the work, might be employed to visit places where Methodism does not at present exist, or where it is in a languishing state; such Ministers being under the direction of the Chairman of the District to which they are appointed, who shall make the necessary arrangements with the Superintendents of the Circuits to which the villages in question may be contiguous, or in which they may be comprehended.

II. That while there is encouraging promise of help for the objects now specified, from some Districts, and from generous promoters of Methodism, yet this Committee deeply feels that these objects cannot be attained, and that the necessary increase of Ministers cannot be supplied, unless the Home-Mission Fund be not only relieved of its present heavy debt, but permanently enlarged.

III. The Committee, therefore, recommends that a special effort be made throughout the Connexion for such relief and augmentation of the Home Mission and Contingent Fund.

The Committee hopes that any efforts and sacrifices which may be required, to strengthen and extend the influence of Methodism in the villages, will be cheerfully made by the Connexion, in consideration of the duty which devolves upon us to counteract the pernicious teaching, so nearly allied to Romanist error, now so widely diffused.

The Report of the Army and Navy Committee was also read, and the recommendations of the Committee respecting Grants for Extraordinary Claims were revised and approved.

The following Resolutions were unanimously adopted :---

Moved by the Rev. C. Prest; seconded by Mr. Dyson, of Sheffield; and supported by the Rev. William Arthur, M.A., and Mr. May, of Bristol:

1. That not only the large and increasing debt, but the many urgent demands made upon this Fund, and the need of greatly extending our Home-Mission work, by establishing Village Circuits,—by meeting the claims of the population in spiritually destitute Districts,—by aiding to sustain our work in feeble Circuits,—and by supplementing the inadequate allowances of Ministers in dependent Circuits, as well as the desirableness of doing much more for the Army and Royal Navy, call for a largely-increased annual income.

Moved by the Rev. Dr. Rigg; seeonded by Mr. Rippon, of Manchester; and supported by Mr. M'Comas, of Dublin:

2. That, in order to secure the necessary increase in the annual income of the Home-Mission Fund, the Conference is earnestly requested to direct the careful attention of the Financial District Committees and the September Quarterly Meetings to this subject, in order that Home-Missionary Meetings may be more generally held, and that efficient local organization may be established for securing these objects. Moved by the Rev. John Bedford; seconded by Mr. S. R. Healey, of Liverpool; and supported by Mr. George Lidgett:

3. That the thanks of this Committee be given to those Ministers and friends who have advocated the claims of our Home Missions during the year; to those who have given valuable personal labour to our Home-Mission work; to the subscribers and collectors; and to those young persons and children who have so largely aided the Home-Mission Fund by Juvenile Associations.

Moved by the Rev Gervase Smith, M.A., Secretary of the Conference; seconded by Mr. Mason, of Newbury:

4. That the thanks of this Committee be presented to the Rev. J. W. Greeves and to Mr. John Vanner, the Treasurers; to the Rev. Charles Prest, the General Secretary; to the Rev. John Bond, the Secretary; and to the Committee of Management, for their valuable services during the year.

That this Meeting is glad to find from the Reports of the Governors, Tutors, and Examiners of the three Branches of the Institution, that the work of the past year has been diligently and successfully prosecuted, and again offers its devout thanks to Almighty God for His continued blessing, while it gratefully acknowledges also the sustained liberality of the Methodist people.

Moved by the Rev. John Bedford; seeonded by Mr. T. P Bunting, of London; supported by Mr. H. J. Atkinson, of London:

2. That, with a view to the continued and increased efficiency of this important Department of Methodism, and having regard to the demands of the Church for a duly qualified and competent Ministry, this Committee commends to the serious attention of the Conference the various matters referred to in the Minutes of the General Committee; viz., the importance of providing an Institution-training for all the Candidates for our Ministry; the expediency of extending the term of residence; the desirability of some preparatory instruction of those Candidates who may require it; the modification of the course of study; and the sufficiency of the Tutorial Staff.

Moved by the Rev. Oliver M'Cutcheon, one of the Representatives of the Irish Conference; seconded by Mr. Henry Swaffield, of the Second London District; supported by Mr. R. Clough, of the Halifax and Bradford District:

3. That this Committee recommends that the cordial thanks of the Conference be given to the Governors and Tutors of the several Branches, to the General and Local Treasurers and Secretaries, and to those Ministers and Gentlemen who have acted as Examiners, for their very efficient and acceptable services.

MEETING OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE OF REVIEW,

HELD IN CAMBORNE, JULY 24TH, 1874.

PRESENT, the REV G. T. PERKS, M.A., President of the Conference, in the Chair; the Rev. Gervase Smith, M.A., Secretary of the Conference; the Rev. L. H. Wiseman, M.A., Ex-President of the Conference; the Rev. Theophilus Woolmer and Mr. I. Hoyle, the Treasurers; the Rev. J. H. Rigg, D.D., and the Rev. G. W Olver, B.A., Principals of the two Training Colleges; the Rev. John Clulow, Visitor of Day and Sunday Schools; the Rev. T. B. Stephenson, B.A., Principal of the Shildren's Home; the Rev. G. O. Bate, Sceretary: and a large number of Ministers and laymen.

An Abstract of the proceedings of the Committee during the year was read. Reported :---(1.) Training Colleges: Admissions, and appointment of Students to Schools, the completion of the Southlands College premises, and the enlargement of the School-Book Depot premises at Westminster (2.) Westminster Chapel: That all liabilities had been discharged; £2,861 15s.7d. having been advanced for this purpose by the Education Committee, promised Subscriptions amounting to £6:39 being unpaid. (3.) Education Fund: That the Treasurers had been authorized to simplify the General Balance-Sheet and to lessen the amount of interest annually payable, by appropriating to the reduction of the debt moneys previously invested or ready for investment; also that, as directed by the last Conference, attention had been given to the position of the Fund, and means had been taken for its augmentation. (1.) Examination of Pupil-Teachers in Religious Knowledge : that this was duly held on March 7th : also that the Committee had resolved to add a Scripture subject in the examination of Candidates to endeavour to simplify the course of Scripture study for Pupil-Teachers, and to adopt measures which may tend to sustain confidence in the fairness of the examination. (5.) The Code, and the Syllabus for Training Colleges for Male Students : suggestions for the improvement of these had been forwarded to the Committee of Council (6.) The Connexional Sunday-School Union: on Education. the Scheme presented to the last Conference had been revised in harmony with the suggestions of the District Meetings, in September, 1873; it had also been considered and further revised by a Special Committee of Ministers and laymen, in April, 1874, and the Education Committee had, in concert with the Book Committee, made arrangements for the completion of the Scheme. (7.) School Transfers: in view of the Resolutions of the last Conference a Sub-Committee had been appointed to consider proposals of Managers and Trustees to transfer Wesleyan Day Schools to School Boards. (8.) Endowed Schools' Amendment Bill: the Committee had suggested to the President the propriety of submitting the measure to the consideration of the Committee of Exigency.

The following statistics of Wesleyan Day and Sunday Schools were presented :---

The number of Day Schools under Local Committees is 886, an increase of 8; not under Local Committees, 20, a decrease of 14; Scholars, 178,717, an increase of 7,345; average attendance, 116,332, an increase of 4,348.

The amount of Children's Pence during the year, was £71,743, being an increase of £6,282; the amount of Government Annual Grants to Wesleyan Schools in 1873-4, was £66,518, being an increase on the previous year of £5,257; subscriptions, etc., £22,452; increase, £1,587. Total Income, £160,713; increase, £13,126. The amount of salaries, including payments to Assistants, Pupil-Teachers, etc., was £103,941, increase, £5,344; other expenses, £60,303; increase, £7,817. Total Cost, £164,244; increase, £13,161.

Thirteen new inspected Schools were opened during the year in new buildings, and thirty were commenced in existing buildings. Thirty-nine Outfit Grants to forty-five departments wcre paid, amounting to £1,423.

The number of Certificated Teachers employed in Wesleyan Schools on the 31st of December, 1873, was 927

The number of Pupil-Teachers and Candidates returned in March last, was 1,950, being an increase on the corresponding period of the previous year of 76. The Annual Examination of Pupil-Teachers in Religious Knowledge was held in accordance with the decision of the Conference. (See *Minutes*, 1873, pp. 203, 204 of this Volume.) 1,829 Pupil-Teachers and Candidates sat for examination. The Report of the Board of Examiners was presented to the General Education Committee in April last, and an Abstract has since been published. The number of Sunday Schools is 5,787, increase, 98; Teachers and Officers, 110,123, increase, 1,677 : Ditto in Society or on trial, 82,325, increase, 1,654 ; Scholars, 688,986, increase, 22,220 ; Ditto in Society or on trial, 45,709, increase, 3,653 ; in Select Classes, 21,913, decrease, 155 ; Young Persons in Bible-Classes conducted by Ministers and others, 26,062, increase, 4,257 Number of Librarics, 2,364, increase, 63 ; volumes, 615,864, increase, 24,147 ; readers, 105,057, increase, 3,480. Schools in which the Catechisms are used 4,602, increase, 48 ; Schools where children are regularly taken to chapel, 5,021, increase 71. Annual Cost $\pounds 44,848$.

The Treasurers presented a Financial Statement.

The Visitor of Day and Sunday Schools read an Abstract of his Report.

The Principal of "The Children's Home" read a Report respecting that Institution.

The following Resolutions were unanimously adopted :---

Moved by the Rev. William Arthur, M.A.; seconded by Mr. Alderman M'Arthur, M.P; supported by the Rev. Frederick E. Toyne:

1 That this Meeting hears with much satisfaction of the continued prosperity and extension of Methodist Day and Sunday Schools and of the Children's Home. While the Meeting highly values the services, both general and specific, which are rendered by the foregoing Institutions, and by the Sheffield and Taunton Colleges, it is of opinion that, in order to meet existing wants, and duly to complete the educational arrangements of Methodism, it is not only desirable to provide for such Higher Education as is contemplated by the Cambridge Scheme, in harmony with the Resolutions of the last Conference, but also to promote the establishment, in various parts of the country, of Methodist Middle Class Schools, so organized as to furnish suitable instruction by the best methods and on moderate terms.

Moved by the Rev. Dr. James ; seconded by Mr. Nicholas B. Downing ; supported by the Rev. Joseph Bush :

2. That this Meeting is gratified to find that the proposal to establish a Connexional Sunday-School Union, which was sanctioned by the last Conference, has received the hearty approval of the Connexion generally, as expressed in the Financial District Meetings, and in the Special Meeting of Ministers and Laymen, convened by the President in April, to consider the Scheme. The Meeting trusts that the arrangements for giving effect to the Scheme will prove satisfactory, and that it will be brought into operation during the ensuing year.

Moved by the Rev. John Bedford; seconded by Mr. William W Pocock; supported by the Rev. J. Smith Spencer:

3. That while this Meeting is thankful for the increase of the Income of the Education Fund as reported, and is glad to find that a considerable balance has been available for the reduction of debt, it regards the present amount of debt as a serious burden, and strongly recommends its speedy liquidation. To effect this, and also to enable the Committee occasionally to render aid to specially necessitous Day Schools, and to meet the additional charges consequent on the formation of the Connexional Sunday-School Union, the Meeting considers that a further augmentation of the Fund should be forthwith secured.

Moved by the Rev. Dr. Osborn ; seconded by Mr. J. S. Sutcliffe ; supported by Mr. H. Swaffield :

4. That the thanks of this Meeting be presented to the Rev. J. H. Rigg, D.D., Principal of Westminster Training College; the Rev. G. W Olver, B.A., Principal of Southlands Training College; the Rev. T. Woolmer and Mr. I. Hoyle, the Treasurers; the Rev. G. O. Bate, the Secretary; the Rev. J. Clulow, Visitor of Day and Sunday Schools; the Rev. T. B. Stephenson, B.A., Principal of "The Children's Home;" and to the Members of the Acting Committee, for their diligent and faithful services during the year.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO CON-SIDER THE EXTENSION OF METHODISM IN GREAT BRITAIN.

AFTER a careful consideration of numerous facts and figures, the Committee agreed to the following conclusions :—

1 That from the Returns obtained and reported, and from various Connexional documents, the Committee is gratified to observe that large and successful efforts have been made throughout the Connexion, both in towns and villages, since the census of 1851, to provide additional accommodation by the erection and enlargement of Methodist Chapels, and to extend Methodism by means of Home-Missions and other evangelistic agencies.

2. Nevertheless, considering the great increase of the population during that period, and the fact that in many instances, both in towns and villages, little or no accommodation for worship is yet provided by the Connexion; and that it is abundantly evident that without some special Connexional assistance adequate provision is not likely to be made for a considerable time to come, this Committee is deeply convinced that a speedy and general effort should be made to raise a Fund which shall supplement the ordinary Funds of the Connexion, and the local resources of the people, in part to sustain an additional number of Home-Missionary Ministers, whose duty it shall be to preach the Gospel in districts where Methodism does not now exist, and to facilitate the creetion of Chapels where needed, and the enlargement of others which are at present insufficient.

3. At the same time the Committee is fully aware that any plan for the accomplishment of these purposes will necessarily involve the calling out and training of additional Ministers, and will entail, for a time, a serious charge upon the Home-Mission Fund, and upon the Fund of the Theological Institution; and therefore the Committee judges that, whilst the larger part of the total sum to be thus specially raised should be employed to encourage and assist the ercetion and enlargement of Places of Worship in necessitous localities, a reasonable amount should, after eareful consideration, be applied towards meeting the additional charges upon these Funds.

4. Having regard to all these considerations, the Committee is of opinion that the Conference should be recommended to appoint a large and influential Committee, to take steps as soon after the Conference as may be found convenient, with a view to earry into practical effect the proposed movement, by circulating information and instituting a general canvass throughout the Connexion: and, having regard to the importance of obtaining a vigorous and efficient conduct of the enterprise, this Committee unanimously and earnestly requests the Conference to appoint a Minister to aet as Secretary to that Committee.

5. In the judgment of this Committee it is not expedient to establish any separate Department for the distribution in detail of this Fund; but, while it should be maintained and reported upon as a distinct Fund, the moneys raised should be administered through the existing Connexional Agencies, in such manner as to give special assistance to the objects before indicated, and in such proportions as may from time to time be found desirable.

6. This Committee is encouraged to urge these recommendations by the history of the Metropolitan Chapel Building Fund, which in twelve years has helped to provide accommodation for nearly fifty thousand additional worshippers in Methodist Chapels; and by many facts in the records of the General Chapel Committee, and the Home-Missionary Committee, which show that if larger pecuniary resources were available, a great and much needed impulse would be given to local efforts for the extension of Methodism in many parts of the country where it now struggles to render service amidst serious disadvantages, and for its introduction into other places where it is now most carnestly desired.

Q. IV What Ministers have DIED since the last Conference ?

A. 1. In Great Britain, the twenty-six following :---

(1.) RICHARD SMETHAM; who was born at Leigh, Lancashire, in the year 1823. He was brought in early life, through godly training, to a saving knowledge of Christ. Having served as a Local-preacher for several years, and studied in the usual elasses in the Theological Institution, he entered on the work of the ministry in the year 1848. He was modest, sensitive, transparent : a true friend, a brotherly colleague, and a conscientious pastor. As a preacher, he was both logical and imaginative, and gave evidence of extensive reading. His eonceptions of Christianity were elear and comprehensive, and he preached our doctrines with more than ordinary power. In all his pulpit exercises there was a practical bearing and directness which. however lofty his themes, made them very profitable to the people. His last illness was long and painful, but was borne in "the faith of the saints." "I should like," he said, "to have lived to preach the Gospel a little longer, but tell my friends I die in the faith of the Gospel I have preached. God is with me, and I have peace." His last reference to spiritual things was in the language of Job: "I know that my Redeemer liveth." He calmly passed away to rest, August 14th, 1874, in the fiftysecond year of his age, and the twenty-seventh of his ministry.

(2.) THOMAS BURROWS; who was born in Manchester, August 29th, 1807 He was converted to God in early life, while a scholar in a Sabbath-school, in which he afterwards became a teacher. In 1831 he entered the ministry, and was appointed to Jamaica, where, and in other parts of the West Indies, he laboured for fourteen years. On his return to England, he travelled in various Circuits, in which his ministrations were both acceptable and useful. Having been appointed by the Conference to the Kington Circuit, he commenced in 1871 a three years' course of service, in which he manifested much diligence and carnestness in the salvation of souls. His last illness, which was short, was brought on by his taking cold, and took the form of diphtheria, from which he died on Wednesday, August 19th. 1874. During his life he was respected by all who knew him. One of his colleagues speaks of him as having been "exceedingly kind, a conscientious and good man;" and adds that they "scarcely ever parted without his saying, 'Let us preach for souls.'" Many were those who found peace with God through his instrumentality. He had been looking forward with some degree of pleasure to entering on a new sphere of labour in the Andover Circuit. On the morning of his death, he rose, but after taking some refreshment again retired; and in a short time, turning to his daughter, he said, "Rest, perfect rest." and passed away; thus suddenly ending a ministry which had been sustained during forty-three years.

(3.) HENRY POPE WILSON; who was born in London, May The Christian training which he enjoyed in a 11th, 1826. home distinguished by earnest godliness led him, when very young, to a decided closure with the Lord Jesus; and, as he grew up to manhood, his piety was gradually developed and matured. After engaging in various subordinate branches of scrvicc to Christ in His Church, he was accepted as a candidate for the ministry, and admitted to the Richmond Branch of the Theological Institution. Thence he went to the West Indies. where he spent eight years in useful labour. After his return home, he was appointed to Paris, and then to various English Circuits, until, in 1872, he was compelled, by the total failure of his health, to become a Supernumerary He was a diligent, faithful, laborious minister of Christ, and was particularly assiduous in pastoral visitation. Not a few were led to the Saviour through his instrumentality, and many more were comforted and strengthened by his counsels and his sympathy. The period of his retirement was one of much weakness and depression, but he was enabled to rest on the great facts and truths which he had spent his life in proclaiming, and realised the sustaining power of the Spirit of Christ. He died at Hornsey, August 24th, 1874, in the forty-ninth year of his age, and the twenty-fourth of his ministry.

(4.) PETER SAMUEL; who was born in the city of Edinburgh, August 22nd, 1804, and died at Bedford, August 26th, 1874. While a student in the Royal Academy of his native city, he was a subject of deep religious impressions, and united himself to the Presbyterian Church. During a sojourn in London, he was invited to attend the Wesleyan-Methodist ministry, and was introduced to a class-meeting, by which means he becaminstructed in "the way of God more perfectly." On his return to Edinburgh, he united himself to the Methodist Society, and was led to undertake the work of a Local-preacher. Amongst other instances of usefulness, it may be stated that he was the means of leading the late Rev. George Scott, D.D., to become a Methodist. In the year 1830 he offered himself as a candidate for the ministry, and in 1831 was sent out as a missionary to the West Indies, where he laboured for thirteen years with diligence and success. On his return home, he zealously prosecuted his sacred toil, in various Circuits, until the Conference of 1868, when failing health compelled him to retire as a Supernumerary He settled in Bedford, where, by his amiable disposition, catholic spirit, and readiness to aid in every good work, he won the esteem both of our own people and of those of other Denominations. As a minister, he was well grounded in Christian theology, and took great delight in preaching and in conducting prayer-meetings. He was also very attentive to the young, and exceedingly diligent in pastoral visitation. On the evening of his death he met his class as usual, and gave out on that occasion the hymn,--

"Come, let us join our friends above," etc.

He afterwards attended public worship with evident enjoyment. He retired to rest apparently in better health than usual, but in a few minutes was called to his reward. "Absent from the body," he was "present with the Lord." He died in the seventy-first year of his age, and the forty-fourth of his ministry.

(5.) WILLIAM BYTHWAY; who was born at Dudley, in the year 1796, of Methodist parents. He was converted in his sixteenth year, and called into the ministry in 1824. After labouring almost uninterruptedly, and very successfully, for forty years, he retired in 1864 to Manchester; and subsequently, in 1869, to Didsbury, where he died, on September 5th, 1874. Mr. Bythway was a man of good natural endowments, and was esteemed for his sound judgment, unswerving integrity, and fervid picty. His character was singularly transparent and well-balanced. His preaching was racy, sensible, and practical; and a fluent and natural delivery made his earnest addresses acceptable and useful to all classes of hearers, especially mature Christians. By the faithful improvement of his abilities he was enabled to fill with credit his position in our ministry. On becoming a Supernumerary he fully employed his time, as strength permitted, in preaching, visiting the sick, leading a class, and other similar Christian labours. He died, in the "full assurance of faith," in his seventy-eighth year, after a course of unbroken fidelity and uniform excellence.

(6.) GEORGE HAGEN; who was born in London, in the year 1817, and died September 13th, 1874. He gave his heart to

God when about sixteen years of age. In 1840 he entered our ministry, and devoted himself fully to its duties. Mr. Hagen possessed a vigorous mind, which he diligently cultivated. His sermons were remarkable for freshness of thought and purity of They were, moreover, accompanied by the power of the diction. Holy Ghost, and were instrumental in the building up of believers, and in bringing sinners to Christ. He possessed "a meek and quiet spirit," and in all his relations was faithful and While travelling in the Wellingborough Circuit he courteous. had a severe illness, from the effects of which he never recovered. In 1872 he sustained a sore bereavement in the loss of his devoted wife. These and other domestic afflictions bore heavily upon an already shattered constitution; and, in little more than two years after his wife's death, with a matured piety and a firm reliance on the atoning sacrifice of Christ, he passed away to his reward. He was in the fifty-seventh year of his age, and the thirty-fifth of his ministry

(7) JOHN STEVENS; who was born on January 7th, 1790, at Runcton, near Downham, Norfolk. For several years he was a subject of religious impressions, and in 1809, having resolved to dedicate himself to God, he found peace through trusting in "the blood of Jesus." After having been a Local-preacher a short time, he was proposed as a candidate for the ministry, and accepted. In 1813 he began his ministerial career at Hudders-Ile was possessed of a highly sensitive conscience, and fie**kl**. walked unwaveringly in the path of duty It was his great desire to be a thorough Methodist preacher, not only proclaiming the truth faithfully, but attending to all the details of Circuit work. Nothing escaped his notice. His knowledge of the laws and usages of Methodism was very exact. During his public life he was successful in relieving many chapels from debt; and several Circuits have him in grateful remembrance for the good he wrought for them in that way. As a preacher, he was earnest and intensely desirous of pressing the truth home upon the hearts and consciences of his hearers. His sermons were well prepared, and were clear in exposition. The chief subject around which his thoughts delighted to gather was Christ the Both as a minister and a private Christian, he crucified. "walked before God," and made the Divine law the rule of his His health failing, at Bridport, in the second year of his life. travelling in that Circuit, he settled there as a Supernumerary. During the twenty years of his retirement, he won the esteem of persons of all Denominations; and his remains were followed to the grave by representatives of all the churches in the town. His death was eminently peaceful; with strong faith in the mercy of God in Christ Jesus he entered into rest, on September 29th, 1874, in the eighty-fifth year of his age, and the sixtysecond of his ministry,

(8.) THEOPHILUS PUGH; who was born at Shrewsbury, in August, 1801, and died at Gargrave, in the Skipton Circuit, on October 12th, 1874. He had not the advantage of a pious raining, and when a youth was in danger of falling into Socinian error. But he possessed a naturally thoughtful mind, and onestly sought after truth. He was induced to place himself inder the teachings of Wesleyan-Methodism, which were soon dessed to his conversion to God, and to his open connection vith the Church of Christ. He at once became deeply anxious or the spiritual welfare of others, especially of his "kinsmen according to the flesh," some of whom through his pious exerions were early led to embrace "the truth as it is in Jesus." After giving evidence of possessing suitable gifts and graces for the exercise of the Christian ministry, he was accepted by the Conference of 1826, and appointed to the West Indies, where nis public labours were marked by great zeal and power, and ittended with eminent success. He returned home in 1843, ind in various Circuits prosecuted, with much usefulness, his beloved work, until 1865, when he became a Supernumerary. During the more active part of his career he was Chairman of several Districts, and discharged the duties of that office with iniform consistency, conscientiousness, and ability. As a oreacher, he was faithful to his Divine commission, ever fearessly declaring the whole "counsel of God." His sermons were expository, and eminently practical; his delivery fervid, and often very effective. He was a diligent student of the Scriptures, and laboured unceasingly for the salvation of men and the glory of his Master. As a pastor and friend, he was open, kind, and sympathizing. On becoming a Supernumerary, he took charge of the Society at Gargrave, where he rendered good service to the cause of God and to Methodism. His last illness was short, and his death somewhat sudden, but by grace he was found complete in Christ. The night previous to his departure, he asked those who were with him to sing "Rock of Ages," and "Abide with me;" and as far as his failing strength permitted, he joined in singing both hymns. Soon afterwards he said, "The valley is very dark, --- very dark;" almost immediately adding, "But no! I see Jesus yonder. He beckons me, and all is light." These were his last words. He fell asleep, no one pereeiving the precise moment when his happy spirit took its flight to its final home with God.

(9.) JAMES EVANS; who was born at Corris, near Machynlleth, in 1840. He was converted to God in his youth, began early to preach, and entered the ministry in 1864. His thorough simplicity and deep piety invested his character with moral beauty, and gave him more than ordinary influence with the most esteemed of our people. His sermons bore the impress of genius, and evinced a Christian moralist of a high order: they

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were full of practical evangelical truth. His preaching, especially in his later years, was eminently earnest, and corresponded well with the steadfastness of his character and unaffected manner. The better he was known the more he was respected and beloved. In 1874 he was appointed to the Dolgelly Circuit, but in a few weeks was seized with typhoid fever, which proved fatal. For hours before his departure, being in full possession of his mental faculties, he prayed for his family, his brethren in the ministry, each Society and congregation in his Circuit, and for the one he had lately left, after three years of acceptable labour, with such power that the occasion will never be forgotten by those who were present. He then sang the old hymn,—

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"Yn y dyfroedd mawr àr tònau," etc., ("In the great and billowy waters,")

in which he found a striking expression of his own experience, with an emphasis which showed his death to be a glorious victory. His departure took place October 15th, 1874, in the thirtyfourth year of his age, and the eleventh of his ministry.

(10.) RICHARD BELL; who was born at Leeds, June 4th. 1820. When about eighteen years of age he obtained a sense of his saving interest in Christ, and experienced that great inward change which was clearly manifested in his spirit and conduct to the end of life. Having dedicated himself to God, he henceforth yielded a ready compliance with all the claims for service made upon him by the Church of God. As a minister, he gave himself wholly to the discharge of the duties of his office, and occupied a creditable position among his brethren. He had a cultivated and well-furnished mind. Ilis preaching was attractive and edifying, and was the means of winning souls to Christ. His diligent attention to pastoral work, the pains he took to promote the improvement and religious instruction of the young, together with the amiableness of his disposition and the blamelessness of his life, secured for him a large share of esteem and love from the people among whom he laboured. Some of the productions of his pen are of more than average merit, and direct attention to several subjects which, though comparatively seldom considered, are of great moment. At the Conference of 1873 be requested to become a Supernumerary for one year, in the hope that rest would recruit his impaired strength. But his expecta-In his last illness he was found, so long tion was not realised. as consciousness remained, trusting in Christ as his Savier, and looking through Him for eternal life. He died November 14th, 1874, in the fifty-fifth year of his age, and the twentysixth of his ministry.

(11.) JOHN WEVILL; who was born near Launceston, died at Liverpool, on the 11th of December, 1874. Converted

God in early life, he entered upon the work of the ministry, and for fifty-one years was a faithful expositor and zealous preacher of the Word of God. He possessed a sound judgment, and throughout his ministerial course was distinguished by unbending integrity. His character was transparent; his devotion to God simple and sincere; and his discharge of the duties of the ministry was marked by singleness of purpose and great courage. He was of retiring habits; his style of preaching was plain, instructive, and useful. Becoming a Supernumerary in 1864, he settled in Liverpool, where he employed his remaining strength in promoting the various interests of the Brunswick Circuit, preaching with acceptance, meeting a class, and diligently visiting the sick and the poor. As a friend, he was warm and faithful; as a Christian, he walked humbly with God. His end was comparatively sudden; but he was found waiting for the summons, and peacefully passed away, to be "for ever with the Lord," in the eighty-fifth year of his age, and the sixty-second of his ministry.

(12.) BENJAMIN PARKYN ELVINS; who was born at Devonport, January 12th, 1814. He was blessed with a pious ancestry, and at the age of thirteen was converted to God. He became a Local-preacher, in the St. Austell Circuit, when in his seventeenth year. In 1836 he was accepted as a candidate for our ministry, in which he laboured with success for thirty years, gaining in all his Circuits the esteem and affection of the people. On becoming a Supernumerary he resided for one year at Addingham, and then removed to Chippenham, in the Melksham Circuit, where he preached as often as his strength would permit. Not "in age," yet in "feebleness extreme" he lingered on, with eheerful submission to the "rod," and to Him that "appointed" it. Although physically prostrate, his mind retained its power, and was always active. He took a deep interest in all Connexional affairs, and seldom failed to inquire of the ministers about the work of God in the Circuit. The Bible was his chief companion, and books which minister to godly edifying were generally with him. He suffered not only in his own person, but by repeated domestic bereavement. The fire, however, only refined his graces, and made them shine brighter : in all his afflictions he was enabled to triumph. On Christmasday, 1874, he was unusually cheerful, and sang a hymn; but on the evening following he was attacked with bronchitis and fever, which proved fatal. On December 30th, 1874, he quietly passed away, in the sixty-first year of his age, and the thirty-ninth of his ministry.

(13.) ROBERT LEAKE; who died in the seventy-first year of his age. He was born at Wakefield, July 26th, 1804. In early life he experienced the converting grace of God. His first attempts at public speaking were made when he was about twenty years old, and after labouring as a Local-preacher for several years, he was accepted as a probationer for the regular ministry In 1830 he was appointed to his first Circuit ; and for upwards of forty-four years he continued to fulfil "the ministry" which he had "received of the Lord Jesus" with a zeal that never flagged, and a tenderness that never failed. During his long course of service he uniformly showed himself competent and faithful, and was greatly instrumental in promoting the interests of the Church of God. His reading was extensive, and his mind capacious and vigorous. As a preacher, his style was singularly clear and simple, and invariably pointed and striking. His thoughts were rich and comprehensive, and in his delivery there were so much warmth, cheerfulness, and love, that. whilst all were edified, the masses were drawn as by an irresistible attraction. In pastoral duty, and in attention to the young, he was specially diligent. His natural disposition was genial and buoyant, generous and disinterested. In intercourse with his brethren, humility and courtesy were beautifully blended, illustrating the words of the Apostle, "In lowliness of mind let each esteem other better than themselves." His religious experience was unusually peaceful and joyous; and all who loved the Lord Jesus were beloved by him. His death was sudden. On the 6th of January, 1875, he left home, apparently in his usual health, to fulfil a preaching appointment. Owing to some wizure, he fell on his face after walking a few minutes, and very shortly "was not; for God took him."

(14.) LUKE HOULT WISEMAN, M.A.; who was born in the city of Norwich, January 19th, 1822. He was highly favoured in having parents of intelligence and piety, who sheltered his infancy by prayer, and trained him in the nurture of the Lord. Like Samuel, he was taken to the temple when a mere child, and was left there. It might almost be said that he was a saint at twelve, and a preacher at fourteen. The unconscious imitation of sympathy may have had something to do with this early shaping of the man; but the marks of a higher agency were no less distinct, for his conversion was singularly clear, and his call to preach the Gospel was as evident to those who observed his gifts as it was audible to himself. His education was not severely scholastic, but it suited the powers of a youth who had great animal spirits, and enjoyed the pleasures of uninterrupted health, and whose genius made him a student out of doors, where he read nature and men with as much avidity as books; yet his scholarship, without ostentation, was considerable. From the time of his formal dedication to the Methodist ministry, he grew rapidly into eminent usefulness. He laid the foundation of that usefulness in a diligent study of the Scriptures. He acquired a masterly use of the historical and narrative portions of the Sacred Books, and pressed they

into the service of the pulpit with rare felicity and power. His store of Biblical knowledge was ever receiving accessions from the current literature of theology, which he repaid by the contributions of his own skilful and vigorous pen; and he gathered ripe wisdom in the varied walks of ministerial and pastoral labour, so that the teaching and sympathy which pervaded his sermons, together with the frankness, simplicity, and earnestness of his manner, made his ordinary ministrations attractive and powerful, securing a popularity that never waned. To our Foreign Missionary Society, to the Secretariat of which he was appointed in 1868, he brought a passionate love for the Missionary cause, which had been fostered by an early connection with the Anti-Slavery Association, and the British and Foreign Bible Society. When his position in the Mission House enabled him to give exclusive heed to calls for Missionary help, and made him familiar with the noble cares of Missionary life, his voice rang through the Connexion from the Society's platforms in strains of defence, of narrative, and of appeal, which quickened the zeal of multitudes, and often found immediate response in the consecration of men for the work. In Committee he was an able counsellor; in departmental labour a generous and affectionate colleague. In 1872, his brethren placed him at the head of the Conference, and he presided over its assemblies with signal ability. His year of office brought with it duties of exceptional gravity, and he discharged them with memorable sagaeity, impartiality, and firmness. He was everywhere efficient, for no work found him unprepared; but on what may be called the great occasions of his ministry, he rose up to the service demanded of him with a charming forgetfulness of self; and whether as President of our own Conference he entrusted the solemn obligations of the Christian ministry to his younger brethren, or whether as our delegate to other Conferences he represented in their pulpits and at their meetings the teaching, the growth, and the spirit of his own Church, he eminently justified the public appreciation of his talents. Methodism never had a more fearless champion of her rights, or a more loyal expounder of her theology. With all this fidelity to a particular Christian Body, he abhorred a sectarian spirit, and accounted it one of his chief privileges to avow his fellowship with all who "love our Lord Jcsus Christ in sincerity." His fine character was the growth of a personal faith rooted in Jesus ; and his Christian walk was so circumspect that, through the trying vieissitudes and temptations of a ministerial life, he never permitted himself to surrender, for an instant, the dignity of an ambassador of Christ. Searcely a moment's space was given to this servant of God even to lay down his work : he was snatched from its engagements and responsibilities in the

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twinkling of an cye; and, thus suddenly glorified, he entered into the joy of his Lord on the night of Wednesday, February 3rd, 1875, in the fifty-fourth year of his age, and the thirtyfourth of his ministry.

(15.) JOSEPH LAWTON; who was born near Farnworth, Bolton. Lancashire. He was the son of pious parents, who took an active part in the cause of Methodism. He gave his heart to God in youth, and entered the ministry in his twenty-fourth year, devoting himself to the work with earnestness and vigour. He was remarkable for his shrewdness and great natural vivacity : and he had a vein of humour which made him a genial companion and an agreeable colleague. He laboured in some of our leading Circuits with much acceptance. In the pulpit he was popular, useful, and often powerful, especially during the earlier period of his ministry, and when in the prime of life. His sermons were natural in their arrangement, truly evangelical. pointed, and practical, and rendered both interesting and instructive by apt illustrations. At the last Conference he became a Supernumerary, and retired to the quiet village of Brading. where he calmly awaited his Master's will. His affliction was painful, but he endured it with exemplary patience, often expressing his gratitude to those who tenderly ministered to his comfort. As his end drew nigh, he was favoured with gracious manifestations of the Divine presence, and testified that his hope was "firm as a rock." His countenance became radiant with the "hope of the glory of God;" and, when utterance failed, he strove to make known his joy by efforts to clap his hands in triumph. Thus he entered into the presence of his Lord, near midnight, on February 9th, 1875, in the sixty-sixth year of his age, and the forty-second of his ministry.

(16.) WILLIAM RICKETTS; who was born in the year 1801. He entered the ministry in the twenty-eighth year of his age, and continued in active service for thirty-one years, when he was compelled, by a painful bronchial ailment, to retire. During the last two years of his life, both his mental and physical vigour were greatly impaired. He was a man of honourable spirit, of simple and unpretending deportment, of reserved and studious habits. In his several Circuits he was much esteemed, not only for his faithful service, but also for his firmness of principle, his judicious management, and his conciliatory spirit. By his colleagues in the ministry, to whom he endeared himself by kindness and brotherly consideration, he was beloved. His thoughtful, practical sermons were delivered in a calm and deliberate manner; and while they were useful to his congregations generally, they were especially appreciated by his more intelligent hearers. He bore grateful testimony to his possession of "peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ." Pressed by the pain of severe disease, he sighed for the repose of "the peaceful

grave," while he looked beyond it to the higher rest, provided through Him who is "the Resurrection and the Life." His last recorded desire was expressed in the words,---

> "Safe into the haven guide, O receive my soul at last!"

He died in Liverpool, on the 25th of February, 1875, in the seventy-fifth year of his age, and the forty-sixth of his ministry.

(17) THOMAS BROWN; who was born at Hunslet, Leeds, June 7th, 1799. The early part of his life was spent under the influence of pious parents, who trained him "in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." He was converted to God when fifteen years old, and at the age of eighteen became a Local-preacher. He was led to offer himself for the work of the ministry, and having been accepted by the Conference of 1825, was sent to the Ipswich Circuit. For forty-two years he faithfully discharged, in some of our most laborious Circuits, the duties of a Methodist preacher. As a Superintendent, he was uniformly kind to his colleagues, attentive and judicious in the management of affairs, and diligent and punctual in the fulfilment of the various duties devolving upon him. His sermons were prepared with eare, and calmly but impressively delivered. In 1867 he became a Supernumerary. During the past four years the nature of his disease was such as to prevent his taking part in any public service. In his last illness he rested upon the Lord Jcsus alone. A little before his death he said, "He has been my foundation, my only foundation, for sixty years :---

> 'This all my hope, and all my plea, For me the Saviour died.'"

His latest words were, "At eventide it shall be light." Thus peacefully he entered into rest on Thursday, February 25th, 1875, in the seventy-sixth year of his age, and the fiftieth of his ministry.

(18.) THOMAS BRUMWELL; who was born at Newcastle-on-Tyne, in the year 1813. In very early life he was a subject of religious impressions, and at the age of twelve was made a "new creature" in Christ Jesus. His successful efforts in different spheres of usefulness led to the belief that he was called to the work of the Christian ministry. He was accepted by the Conference of 1838, and sent to the Hoxton Institution, where he earned for himself the reputation of being a diligent student and a devoted Christian. Hc was distinguished by a uniformly kind and peaceable disposition, and by his unremitting attention to all the obligations of his office as a minister of the Lord Jcsus. In the pulpit he gave evidence of careful preparation, of devoutness of spirit, and of an earnest desire to make the truth the instrument of salvation to his hearers. He was a diligent pastor, and in fulfilling the duties of a Superintendent

he combined affability and gentleness with a jealous regard for the faithful administration of Methodist rules. While strongly attached to his own community, he manifested great catholicity of spirit, and won the esteem of many of the members of other Christian denominations. At the Conference of 1873 he was appointed to Morley. He entered upon this sphere of labour with mingled feelings of gratitude and joy, inasmuch as it formed part of the Circuit to which he was sent when commencing his ministerial life. While devoting himself to his work with exemplary fidelity and zeal, he was stricken with a disease which baffied medical skill. During the whole of his affliction he had perfect peace. When informed by his medical attendant that all hope of recovery was gone, and that his end was near, his serenity of spirit remained undisturbed, and he replied, "All right, doctor; I am in God's hands: He cannot err !" Shortly before he passed away, he quoted with much feeling the lines.-

> "There we shall see His face, And never, never sin," etc.

He died on March 8th, 1875, in the sixty-second year of his age, and the thirty-sixth of his ministry.

(19.) JOHN KIRK (B); who was born at Barrowby, August 7th, 1818. IIe was early converted to God, and began to preach when little more than sixteen years of age. In 1839 he became a student in the Theological Institution, Abney House, and reeeived his first appointment to a Circuit two years later. In 1852 he was appointed to accompany the late Rev Robert Young on his deputation to Australia, with the design of his remaining in the Colony as a missionary. He set out three times on the voyage, but meeting with various disasters at sea he returned, and resumed his ministerial work in England. He possessed quickness of perception, with readiness of speech; was a diligent Biblical student, and most painstaking in his pulpit preparations. His preaching, which was of the expository kind, was singularly rich and impressive, and his ministry generally was efficient and successful. In his several Circuits he paid great attention to young men, conducting Bible-classes, which were largely attended, and were of considerable advantage to He had a natural aptitude for literary work, as his pubmany lications show; and his contributions often enriched the pages of our periodical literature. Such labours were often pursued under heavy pressure, but were never allowed to interfere with The over-. the conscientious discharge of his ministerial duties. taxing of his powers, however, produced its natural result. In 1866 he had a paralytic seizure, which ultimately compelled him, in 1869, to retire from active Circuit work. After this he became gradually enfechled, both in mind and body; but his

sufferings were borne without a murmur. At times he longed to be so far restored as to be able to do a little more for the cause of his Divine Master. He was rarely joyous, but possessed a settled peace, and, under most trying circumstances, exhibited great calmness and firm trust in Christ. The attack which proved fatal took place about six weeks before his death. During brief intervals of consciousness he desired his favourite hymns to be read aloud, among which was the verse,—

> "Then shall I see, and hear, and know All I desired and wished below; And every power find sweet employ In that eternal world of joy."

When speech failed him, he was desired to raise his hand if he felt Christ to be precious to him. This he did, with great difficulty, but in a manner never to be forgotten by those about him. As the closing scene drew nigh his breathing became easy, his cyc brightened, and a heavenly smile rested upon his countenance. He peacefully passed away to rest, March 15th, 1875, in the fifty-seventh year of his age, and the thirty-fourth of his ministry.

(20.) GEORGE KEVERN; who was born at Devonport. He was the son of pious parents, who were much attached to Methodism, and were highly esteemed by those with whom they were associated. Mr. Kevern was led to give his heart to God in his He entered our ministry in 1839, and laboured with youth. great zeal and success for some years in the South Sea Islands. His strength failing, he was at length reluctantly compelled to return to England. He afterwards superintended the passing of the Tongan New Testament through the press. In the various Circuits in which he travelled he was greatly beloved, and was permitted to witness considerable spiritual prosperity. Although his health was feeble, he was most assiduous in the discharge of his duties, and his kindness and goodness endeared him to all who became acquainted with him. As a Superintendent he was courteous, prompt, and faithful. Notwithstanding his undoubted ability, he was unassuming and retiring in his manner. Ilis preaching was marked by great clearness, soundness, and fidelity. He was accustomed to dwell chiefly upon the leading doctrines of the Gospel, and always showed a distinct apprehension of his subject. In his last illness, which was very short, his severe sufferings were endured with much patience. He died in peace on March 24th, 1875, in the fifty-eighth year of his age, and the thirty-sixth of his ministry.

(21.) JOSEPH HOLLIS; who was born at Kenwick Park, Ellesmere, February 14th, 1803. His parents belonged to the Established Church, and brought up their son according to its tenets. An accident, however, which rendered him lame for life, occasioned his removal, for purposes of surgical attendance,

to Manchester, and he was there brought under the ministry of the Methodists. He became deeply convinced of sin, and after a somewhat long and painful season of conviction, he found Christ, to the joy of his soul. He entered the ministry in the year 1824, and for forty-seven years pursued his labours as a preacher and pastor with diligence and success. His sermons were characterized by much originality, great power of analysis. and unswerving fidelity in unfolding the mediatorial work of the Lord Jesus. Possessed of a clear and vigorous understanding. and having formed habits of patient and carnest application, he brought out in his teaching the fruit of eareful and mature thought. He "fed the flock of God," and exercised an edifying ministry He was a man of modest and gentle spirit; but sometimes a constitutional timidity gave him a peculiarity of manner in the pulpit, and made him appear somewhat stiff and formal. He was ever mindful of and liberal to the poor. In domestic life, he was full of goodness; he was loved and trusted by his colleagues; he was respected by all his people; and honoured by not a few. At the Conference of 1871, Mr. Hollis became a Supernumerary; but after twelve months' rest he undertook pastoral work at Saltburn-on-the-Sea, hoping to be useful to the Society and congregation there; but his task was His last illness was long and painful, but his trust in done. God was unshaken. The depression of disease excluded lively joy, but never disturbed his peace. As the end drew ncar, he said, "I am marked to fall." To one of the ministers of the Circuit he said, "Tell my brethren I am on the Rock. There is no other foundation." When asked, "Is Christ precious to you ?" he answered, "Yes, precious." He died at Kentish Town, on Monday, April 12th, 1875, in the seventy-third year of his age, and the fifty-first of his ministry.

(22.) WILLIAM HARRISON KENDALL, son of the late Rcv. James Kendall (Λ) ; who was born at Cockermouth, in the year 1836. After a severe struggle with scepticism, he was converted to God in the eighteenth year of his age At that time he was resident in London, and accustomed to sit under the ministry of the late Rev. George B. Macdonald. In the year 1858 he became a candidate for our ministry, and entered the Theological Institution at Didsbury. The opportunities there afforded for mental and spiritual improvement were highly appreciated and diligently used by him. By attention to reading and study, and by the careful cultivation of good natural gifts, and of a holy life, he soon became a minister of more than ordinary acceptance and His preaching was earnest, spiritual, and soulusefulness. saving, and many will be the crown of his rejoicing in the day of the Lord Jesus. Next to the study of God's Word, his delight was in God's works. Natural science had special attractions for him, and in preaching he would, with good taste and effect,

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make its stores subservient to the elucidation of his subject. As a pastor, he was exemplary, caring for all, especially the sick and poor; and his visits were nowhere more welcome than in the ehamber of the suffering and the dying. His last sermon was delivered at Redcar, on Sunday morning, April 11th, from the words, "Thou wilt show me the path of life; in Thy presence is fulness of joy; at Thy right hand there are pleasures for evermore." On reaching home he was taken ill. For three days it was hoped that he was recovering. Discase, however, made a second attack; and he suddenly fell asleep in Jesus, on

Wednesday, April 14th, 1875, in the thirty-ninth year of his

age, and the fifteenth of his ministry. (23.) METHUSELAH THOMAS; who was born at Llangadog, South Wales. He entered the ministry in 1832. His preaching was earnest, practical, and powerful, and God greatly owned his efforts. He was faithful and diligent in matters pertaining to the Methodist economy, and took a lively interest in all movements connected with the work of God, especially in the North For many years he was subjected to partial Wales District. blindness; yet, by his retentive memory, he would, in his regular ministry, rehearse a pertion of Seripture, and give out hymns, naming their pages, with surprising correctness. In the year 1872 he became a Supernumerary. The last three years of his life were spent in the Llanfair Circuit, throughout which he laboured faithfully. His last illness was short and severe, but he bore it with Christian fortitude. On April 30th, 1875, he entered into rest, in the seventy-second year of his age, and the forty-third of his ministry.

(24.) MICHAEL JOHNSON; who was born at Barnard Castle, April 22nd, 1814, and died at Macclesfield, May 5th, 1875. He was descended from an old Methodist family, and under the godly teachings of his parents early became a subject of deep religious impressions. At the age of fourteen he received the witness of the Spirit to his adoption through Christ; and his whole subsequent life was marked by entire consecration to God. About four years after his conversion he became a leader and Local-preacher. He entered the ministry in 1838. His preaching was characterized by great earnestness, and was crowned with considerable success. His sermons, which were prepared with the utmost care, were clear and foreible expositions of evangelical truth. His appeals to the eonseiences of his unconverted hearers were frequently powerful and awakening. In the discharge of his duties as a Superintendent and Chairman of a District, he was painstaking, firm, wise, and affectionate. His last illness was short, but very severe. The day before he died, when it seemed to him that his earthly career was almost finished. he said, "I have not now to examine the foundations of my faith; I have no misgiving-all is firm; I am a poor sinner,

very humbly trusting in Jesus. He is all-sufficient—my precious Saviour Farewell, sin and death ! I am just touching the icy flood;' the first shiver of humanity is over. I shall gain in triumph the other side.'' A few minutes before his departure a colleague quoted part of the twenty-third Psalm, remarking, '' Thou art with me;' that makes all the difference.'' With deep feeling the dying saint responded, ''Yes; that does make all the difference.'' Then he fell asleep in Jesus.

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(25.) THOMAS CROSBY; who was born at Stockwith, in the Gainsborough Circuit, March 25th, 1816, and died at Haslingden, June 28th, 1875. His parents were zealous classleaders, and trained their children "in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." At the age of eighteen he was converted to God, and in the course of a few months began to preach. After much prayer and deep reflection, he was constrained to offer himself for the work of the ministry, and at the Conference of 1842 was appointed to a Circuit. For nearly thirty-three years he discharged the duties of his sacred office with great fidelity and increasing acceptance, and in the Circuits in which he successively laboured his name is fragrant. He was an eminently holy man; "integrity and uprightness preserved" him. He was "elothed with humility;" and the guileless simplicity and beautiful saintliness of his character impressed all who knew him. He was "an example of the believers, in word, in conversation, in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity." He possessed a vigorous and well-disciplined mind, and his attainments as a scholar and a theologian were much greater than those who had not the privilege of close intimacy with him would have supposed. His sermons were full of thought, rich in exposition, and remarkably practical and useful. He aimed at the heart, but it was always through the understanding; and not a few of those who heard him will be the crown of his rejoicing in the day of the Lord Jesus. He was a conscientious pastor, and had a special aptitude for ministering consolation to the sick and dying. His end was sudden. On Sunday morning, June 27th, he attended Divine service, at the close of which he complained of feeling unwell: after a few hours' suffering he fell into a deep sleep, from which he could not be roused, and in that state passed away to his eternal rest.

(26.) SAMUEL TIMMS; who was born at Ashby-de-la-Zouch, in the year 1802. When an apprentice in Derby, he was brought into intercourse with the Methodists, and under a sermon preached by the late Rev. Joseph Hollingworth, was led to give his heart to God, join himself to Christ's people, and tell his class of boys in the Sunday-school what "great things" the Lord had done for him. He was accepted as a candidate for the ministry in 1827, and was sent by the President, the Rev. John Stephens, as a supply to the Liskeard Circuit. Until lines,—

1846, he was stationed chiefly in Devon and Cornwall, where he was extensively useful. He was a hard-working and successful Methodist preacher, always ready for labour when duty called, and where work was to be done for Christ. He was blessed with a large measure of health and strength, and gave himself wholly to his ministry as the one great object of his life. At the last District Meeting he said that he still intended to continue in the work, and arranged to attend the Conference. On Sunday, July 18th, he preached with unusual power from the words, "Thou shalt guide me with Thy counsel." On the following Friday he complained of indisposition, but was present at the prayer-meeting on Saturday evening. He was unable to take his appointment on the Sabbath, and five days afterwards was informed that his medical attendants had grave doubts respecting his case. He replied, "All is well; I am in God's hands." Being asked if he had any fear, he answered, "No," and repeated the

"My Jesus to know, and feel His blood flow," etc.

About five minutes afterwards he raised his hands, lifted his eyes towards heaven, and calmly entered into the joy of his Lord. His death took place on July 30th, 1875, in the seventythird year of his age, and the forty-eighth of his ministry.

N.B.—The obituary notices of the Rev. William Davies, D.D., and the Rev. Robert Owen, who died during the Conference, will be inserted in the *Minutes* of 1876.

2. In Ireland, two; viz.,-

(1.) JOHN HILL; who was born on the 28th of April, 1787, at Hillhead, near Ballycastle, County Antrim. Though in early youth manifestly the subject of Divine grace and watched over by pious parents, he remained undecided until his ninetcenth year. He then accepted an invitation to meet in class, and there resolved by the grace of God to devote himself to His service. His repentance unto life was not accompanied with such distress as many experience, but his faith in the atoning death of Christ was steadfast and unfeigned, and God gave him the enjoyment of His pardoning love. From this time he diligently cultivated his mind, with zeal and constancy giving himself up to the one great object of bringing sinners to their Saviour. In 1815, he was offered to, and accepted by, the Conference as a candidate for our ministry, and commenced his long career of evangelistic labours with marked success in that mission then called the Ards. He was ever faithful in matters of discipline, tender and watchful in pastoral care, regular and laborious in his Itinerant course. He made the Sacred Scriptures and our approved Methodist Theology and experimental literature his constant and prayerful study. He was humble, modest, and

retiring; sedate, grave, and cautious; pure in heart and speech and life, loving and devout, he was ever respected and esteemed in private life; and in his public ministrations always acceptable and effective, often of powerfully convincing speech. After forty-two years of active service, he retired; and for some years after, as a Supernumerary, gave valuable aid to the brethren in eharge of the Circuits in which he resided. During the last five years of his life he was entirely unfit for ministerial duty; yet, until very near the end, he engaged in the public worship of God with pleasure and delight. At length "the weary wheels of life" began to move slowly, and after a few days of extreme weakness, happily free from pain, unless when seized by paroxysms of coughing, he passed away, saying, "I have no fear of death, and I long for the more full manifestation of God." He died, February 28th, 1875, in the eighty-eighth year of his age, and the sixtieth of his ministry

(2.) THOMAS BALLARD; who was born in Borrisokane, in the county of Tipperary. IIe was converted to God in his fourteenth year, and was one of the numerous spiritual children of the indefatigable Gideon Ouseley. As that Irish missionary of truly apostolic zeal was preaching in the open air in Mr. Ballard's native town, the Gospel came to his heart "in demonstration of the Spirit," and was "the power of God" to his "salvation." He was appointed to a Circuit in the year 1818. For the lengthened period of forty-six years he prosecuted his evangelical labours with unwearied diligence, unquenchable zeal, and encouraging success. When the weakness and infirmities of advanced years compelled him to become a Supernumerary, with unabated ardour he rendered effectual aid in promoting the work of God wherever he might be located. As a preacher, he was fervent in manner, clear in exposition, powerful and faithful in application, "commending himself to every man's conscience in the sight of God." He was a diligent and faithful visitor of the members of his flock. He sympathized with them in their sorrows, comforted their hearts by words of Christian counsel, and by commending their case to the Father of all mercies and the God of all comfort. As a friend, he was sincere, disinterested, and faithful. He was of a warm mental temperament, yet genial, kind, and tender-hearted; firm and immovable when he thought principle was concerned, yet reluctant to wound the feelings of any. He was devotedly attached to the doctrines and institutions of Methodism; he ably defended it when assailed, and proved its doetrines to be in harmony with the Word of God. He was truly a faithful man, and feared God above many; and was exemplary in the relations which he sustained towards the Church of God and his family. h his last illness he suffered extreme pain, but he was patient, expressed strong and unwavering confidence in the wisdom and love of his Heavenly Father, and "rejoiced in hope of the glory of God." He received the intelligence that his sickness was unto death with the calmness which a consciousness of adoption into the family of God can alone inspire, and said, "Doctor, I was converted when a boy, and I now can say:

> • My God is reconciled, His pardoning voice I hear, He owns me for His child, I can no longer fear."

Thus a life, from youth to old age, of consceration to the service and glory of Christ realised at its elose the gracious faithfulness of God, and the truth of the last verse read at his family worship : "For this God is our God for ever and ever; He will be our Guide even unto death." Having "served his own generation by the will of God," he fell asleep in Jesus, and entered into the rest which remains for the people of God, on March 10th, 1875, in the eightieth year of his age, and the fifty-seventh of his ministry.

3. In our Foreign Missions, five ; viz.,-

(1.) JOHN CURTIS; who entered into rest on the 5th of August, 1874. After spending three years at the Missionary Theological Institution at Richmond, he was, in 1868, appointed to Honduras, Central America, where he laboured in different Circuits with much zeal and acceptance. He returned to England in impaired health, but was ordained at the Conference of 1872. His health having somewhat improved, he was then appointed to Turk's Island, in the Bahama District, the climate of which was regarded as suitable to his case. On the voyage out he took cold, which resulted in the development of pulmonary disease. After a short career of greatly-interrupted labour in Turk's Island, his medical attendant advised his return once more to England. Accompanied by his wife and child, he proceeded to Puerto Plata, where they embarked in the steamer "Severn." On the following day he ccased to live ; and thus found a watery grave off the Northern Coast of San Domingo. He was a young man of amiable disposition, exhibiting in an eminent degree the "meek and quiet spirit" of his Master. He also possessed the tact and soundness of judgment which arc so essential to the successful prosecution of Mission-work, especially in our West India Stations. His whole character gave promise. had it pleased the Head of the Church to spare his life, of a successful Missionary career.

(2.) JOSEPH F. SOUTHERN; who was born in Shropshire. After spending about two years at the Richmond Branch of the Theological Institution, he was appointed to the West Indies, where he laboured with success for about six years, when he was

suddenly removed from the Church militant to the Church triumphant. While bathing in the sea, at St. Eustatius, on the morning of the 16th of November, 1874, with two of his friends. he was borne by a receding wave so far from land that neither his own efforts nor those of others could rescue him; and thus, by a mysterious providence, was his brief but valued ministry terminated. As a preacher, though not brilliant, he was a "workman that needed not to be ashamed." His sermons. which indicated close thinking and careful preparation, were marked by clearness and simplicity, and were delivered in an easy, carnest and winning style. As a colleague he gained, by his frank and genial disposition, the confidence and esteem of all his brethren; while as a faithful pastor, he was greatly beloved by his flock. His sad and unexpected death not only plunged his bereaved friends and his Circuit in deep distress, but cast a gloom over the entire District.

(3.) JOHN W BELL; a young missionary, who died at the Gambia, Western Africa, of fever, accelerated by an imprudent journey through a dangerous swamp. He had but recently been accepted by the Missionary Committee for this field of service, and had searcely entered upon the duties of his Circuit. He died on December 17th, 1874.

(4.) CLEMENT JOHNS; a native missionary, who was killed br lightning, in Pondoland, near Palmerton, on January 4th, 1875. He was the first native ordained to the Christian ministry in the Natal District. Previous to his death it was observable that he entertained a greater concern than ever for the salvation of his fellows, and he preached to large congregations with much carnestness and power. His genial disposition and growing intelligence, his loving and humble spirit, his genuine pietr, and a happy combination of natural shrewdness, ability, and zeal as a minister of the Gospel, commanded for him the respect and affection of all with whom he came in contact. He was always cheerful; and the more he was known, the more highly was he respected and loved. It was hoped that a long course of Christian usefulness was before him, and it is believed that had he lived his ministry would have been blessed to the conversion of many His removal has occasioned much sorrow among his people, and his memory will be long cherished by the natives to whom he ministered.

(5.) GEORGE SCOTT (D); who was born on November 14th, 1839, at Stockholm, where his father, the late Rev. G. Scott, D.D., was then stationed. At the age of three years he came with his parents to this country. He received a good education, and was of an open, truthful, and affectionate disposition. The great spiritual change was wrought in him by Divine grace when he was about twelve years of age, from which time he walked "in the fear of the Lord, and in the comfort of the Holy

Ghost." Being called of God, and "well reported of by the brethren " who knew him, he was received as a candidate for the ministry, and was sent to the Theological Institution at Richmond. Here he applied himself with earnestness and success to study and evangelistic labours. His first appointment was to a station in South Africa, and after the usual period of probation, he was ordained to the work of the ministry. From the time of his arrival in South Africa, he was more or less afflicted; and, in 1871, he was compelled to return home in search of health. The change having proved somewhat beneficial, he was again appointed to the Foreign work in 1873. His last year was spent at Bloem-Fontein, where, in addition to ordinary ministerial labour, his energies were devoted to the instruction of native young men for the work of evangelists. His last public service was on Sunday, November 29th, 1874, and from that time his strength gradually failed. He was unselfish, considerate, and true; of an ardent disposition, and thoroughly devoted to the labours of his office. As a student, he was diligent, especially in searching the Scriptures; as a pastor, not unmindful of his duty, giving especial attention to the little ones of the flock; and as a preacher, he strove to interest and instruct those who heard him, his sermons being carefully thought out, and delivered with much power. He died, in firm confidence in his Saviour, on February 10th, 1875, in the thirtysixth year of his age, and the thirteenth of his ministry.

7 The Conference adopts the following Rules in relation to the Schools :---

(1.) Considering that the age at which the boys have been accustomed to leave school is the most important and valuable for the purposes of education, it is agreed that none shall henceforth be admitted into the Schools under nine years of age, and that they may remain the usual term of six years. Should parents prefer it, their sons may be admitted at ten years, and remain until sixteen years of age.

(2.) In any ease in which the Educational Allowance has been received by the parent, the claim upon the Schools' Fund shall be understood to have been met and satisfied for that year.

(3.) In all eases of an additional year being granted, on payment, to boys who have not been at school six years, the sum of $\pounds 25$ shall be paid, which sum shall be inclusive of the $\pounds 6$ 6s. from the Children's Fund; but in all eases of a request for a year additional to the six years, the payment shall be $\pounds 30$, inclusive of the $\pounds 6$ 6s. These payments shall be due in four instalments, one after each quarter-day. In all eases of request for an additional year, the Committee shall be satisfied that the character and diligence of the applicants are such as to render their return to the School advantageous to the other boys.

(4.) In future, the Competition for Scholarships and Medals shall be restricted to those boys who have not been more than six years at the Schools.

(5.) For the convenience of the officers of the Fund, the payment for education to both boys and girls shall commence at nine years instead of eight years, and be continued until fifteen years; the ninth year to be reekoned from the Christmas before payment.

8. Application for the admission of *daughters* to the Schools now established for them, must be made, as in the case of boys, through the District Meetings; and the allowances for those who are admitted shall not be claimed by the parents as heretofore from the Schools' and Children's Funds. The parents of *boys* in the Schools are also specially eautioned not to claim for them from the Children's Fund, much confusion having arisen in some eases from inattention to this rule.

9. The Conference directs that a certificate of health, signed by a medical practitioner, shall be required at the commencement of each term, in the case of all boys and girls received into, or returning to, our Connexional Schools. 10. The Conference adopts the following Regulations in relation to the Schools for girls :---

(1.) That until as ample provision be made for the Connexional education of the daughters as for the sons of our Ministers, no girl shall be received into the Schools under *twelve* years of age, and that the time of continuance in the Schools be restricted to *four years*.

(2.) That in future each applicant be required to pass a preliminary examination, in subjects to be hereafter agreed upon, before admission to the Schools.

HOME-MISSION AND CONTINGENT FUND.

Q. XVII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference in reference to the HOME-MISSION AND CONTINGENT FUND?

A. 1. The Conference receives and adopts the Report of the Committee of Management, and of the Army and Navy Committee, and directs that the Returns from the Army and Navy and Reserve forces be printed in the Minutes. (See Appendixes, Nos. VI. and XI., 1875.)

2. The Conference records its devout gratitude to Almighty God for the encouraging success which has attended the prosecution of our Home-Mission work, and our ministrations to Wesleyans in the Army and in the Royal Navy, and especially for the blessed results of the Evangelical Mission in Lincolnshire; and trusts that the appointment of several District Missionaries, to labour among our scattered village populations, may be owned of God in the awakening and conversion of souls.

3. The Conference expresses its satisfaction with the results which have hitherto attended the formation of District Sustentation Funds, and its gratification that from some of these Funds a surplus of about ± 300 has been received by the Committee of Management to supplement ministerial allowances in more destitute Districts; and most carnestly recommends the establishment of a Sustentation Fund in every District, especially in the more wealthy, that a larger surplus may be furnished for this object.

4. The Conference adopts the following Recommendations of the Committee of Management :--

(1.) That it is undesirable to continue to publish the names of Ministers receiving Grants for Removals, Afflictions, and Supplies

(2.) That as the names of Ministers receiving Grants, according to the preceding Resolution, are no longer to be published, it is obviously necessary that Grants for Removal Expenses, a well as for Afflictions, should in future be submitted to the Quarterly Meeting of the Circuit on which the amount will be charged, and should be approved by the District Meeting to which that Circuit belongs. 1875.

(3.) That, in future, any Supply sent by the President to a Circuit shall be paid at the rate of Thirty Guineas per annum, for the time he is in the Circuit, without reference to Quarter-Days.

(4.) That in all cases where a House is needed for the Orphans of a deceased Minister, the usual Grant for Furniture shall be allowed.

(5.) That receipts from the Surplus of District Sustentation Funds shall be administered on the following principles :---

i. That the sum or sums so received shall not be used to relieve the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund of obligations which exist under present regulations, and that aid from such sum or sums shall not be confined to the claimant Circuits.

ii. That such surplus receipts may be used in the encouragement of Sustentation Funds in the Districts, by making Grants to Committees of District Funds for their detailed Circuit distribution.

iii. That the Grant given in all cases shall be dependent upon there being a Sustentation Fund in the District, and upon the sum voted being met by at least an equal amount.

5. In view of the fearful prevalence of ungodliness and irreligion in our country, the widespread superstition, and the many subtle and insidious forms of infidelity, demanding vigorous and sustained effort for the extension of our Home-Mission work, the Conference directs that in the Financial District Meetings and in the September Quarterly Meetings special attention shall be given to this subject, and that arrangements shall be made for holding as many Home-Missionary Meetings as possible in the various Circuits, and for the appointment of Collectors, and the formation of Juvenile Home and Foreign Missionary Associations where they do not at present exist.

6. The Conference recommends that in every Circuit a Home-Missionary Committee and a Secretary be appointed to promote in detail systematic efforts to increase the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund.

7 JUVENILE HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONARY ASSOCIATIONS. —The Conference is glad to know that there has been a gratifying increase in the number of Juvenile Home and Foreign Missionary Associations during the year, and it entertains the hope that these useful Associations—aiding at once our Home and Foreign Missions—will be established in all our Circuits.

The Conference is decidedly of opinion, that wherever sums, large or small, are collected avowedly for the Foreign or Home Missions, the whole amount should be remitted to the Treasurers of these Funds respectively, to be administered under the direction of their Committees; and that sums so remitted to the Home-Mission Fund should entitle a Circuit to favourable consideration, if it request a grant for any effort within its boundaries which may be a legitimate object for the application of moneys collected for Home-Missions. (*Minutes*, 1863.)

On this subject the following modification has been made:-

In the case of Circuits which are not in a position to ask for the appointment of a Home-Missionary Minister, and to give the pledge required, but which feel the necessity of adopting some plan of *Home-Missionary operations*, the subjoined allocation shall be allowed :—

One-third of the sums received by Juvenile Home and Foreign Missionary Associations, to be paid to the Funds of the Foreign Missionary Society, "it being expressly understood that in every case the contribution to the Foreign Missions shall be at least equal to what has been presented from Christmas Offerings, on the average of several preceding years :"

One-third to the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund :

One-third to the Circuit, to be expended in support of local movements of a *directly Home-Missionary character*, under the direction of the Superintendent, and of a Committee to be appointed at the December Quarterly Meeting.

In all other cases the former Minute of the Conference remains in force.

8. The Conference deems it expedient to reprint the following Rule from the Minutes of 1797 :---

"That all bills for the support of travelling preachers and their families, in respect to deficiencies, house-rent, fire, candles, sickness, travelling expenses and all other matters of a temporal kind for their support, for which the Circuits eannot provide, shall first meet with the approbation of the Quarterly Meeting, and be signed by the General Steward of the Circuit," before they can be brought to the District Committee."

9. Home-Mission Regulations. — Each Home-Missionary Minister is directed, with the concurrence of the Superintendent Minister, to forward with his Journal, signed as now by the Superintendent, to the General Secretary for the information of the Committee, a copy of the Circuit-Plan ; and a quarterly statement of the number of full and accredited Church-members, and of persons on trial, in connection with the place or places specially assigned to him as his Mission-District.

10. MR. JOHN VANNER and the REV. JOHN W GREEVES are re-appointed the Treasurers; the REV. CHARLES PREST, the General Secretary; + and the REV JOHN BOND, Secretary. The Committee, which shall meet before the next Conference, shall consist of the Committee of Management, and the—

3. The Conference urgently recommends to the Committees of the several departments the favourable consideration of the following suggestion of the Treasurers of the Auxiliary Fund:— "That all Ministers, including Preachers on trial, not appointed as Ministers of Circuits, but separated or engaged to other service, shall have a sum paid for them by the department of service to which they are appointed equivalent to that which is provided for the Circuit Ministers by the Class contributions."

9. The Conference, having regard to the special requirements of Missionary Students who may be intended for service in the East, resolves further, that such Students shall be allowed to remain in the Institution an additional year after the conclusion of the usual term, with a view to their instruction in subjects having direct reference to the work for which they are designated.

10. In the case of Candidates for the Ministry, who are on the President's List of Reserve, and have been sent into Circuits during the year, the District Meetings to which they may belong are directed to express an opinion as to the desirability or otherwise of their admission to the Institution.

EXAMINATION OF CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY.

Q. XX. What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the EXAMINATION OF CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY?

A. 1 The Conference resolves that the Special Examination of Candidates for the Ministry shall be conducted by a Committee in two Sections, having charge of Examinations to be held simultaneously at Richmond and Didsbury respectively.

2. That the two Sections of this Committee shall be constituted as follows :---

(1.) THE SOUTHERN SECTION, to meet at Richmond, shall consist of the President and the Secretary of the Conference, the Ex-Presidents resident in London, the Secretaries of the Wesleyan-Methodist Missionary Society (one excepted), the Tutors and Governor of the Richmond Branch of the Theological Institution, the General Secretary of the Theological Institution, the General Secretary of the Theological Institution, the Local Secretary of the Richmond Branch; the Connexional Editors; the Secretary of the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund; one of the General Secretaries of the Examination Committee; the Revs. Dr. Rigg, Dr Moulton, and Jacob Stephenson, B.A.; together with twelve other Ministers of the two London Districts, six of whom shall be annually elected by the District Committee of each of the said Districts in May.

(2.) THE NORTHERN SECTION, to meet at Didsbury, shall consist of the Ex-President of the Conference; the Ex-Presidents living in the Manchester and adjoining Districts; one of the Secretaries of the Missionary Society; the Tutors and Governors of the Didsbury and Headingley Branches of the Theological Institution; the Local Secretary of the Didsbury Branch; one of the General Secretaries of the Examination Committee; the Rev. John S. Banks; together with twenty-one Ministers of the Liverpool, Manchester, and Bolton Districts, seven of whom shall be annually elected by the District Committee of each of the said Districts in May

3. That Candidates from the Liverpool, Manchester, and Bolton Districts shall be summoned to the Southern Examination, and Candidates from the First and Second London Districts to the Northern Examination: all other Candidates shall be summoned at the discretion of the General Examination Secretaries, with due regard to the cost of travelling.

4. That two Sub-Committees, to read and report on the manuscript sermons of the Candidates, shall be annually appointed as follows :---one for the Southern Section, consisting of six Ministers, three of whom shall be chosen by the District Committee of each of the two London Districts from among the Ministers elected by it as members of the Examination Committee; and another for the Northern Section, consisting of six Ministers, two of whom shall be chosen by the District Committees of the 1875.

Liverpool, Manchester, and Bolton Districts respectively, from among the Ministers elected by them as members of the Examination Committee.

5. That the Literary Examination Paper for the Examination shall be prepared in succession by the Classical and Mathematical Tutors of each of the three Branches of the Theological Institution; and that the Theological Paper for the Examination shall be prepared in succession by each of the three Theological Tutors of the said three Branches.

6. That the Classical and Mathematical Tutors of the Richmond Branch shall be the Literary Examiners for the Southern Section of the Committee; and that the Classical and Mathematical Tutors of the Didsbury and Headingley Branches shall be the Literary Examiners for the Northern Section of the Committee.

7. That the Examiners of the Papers in Theology written by the Candidates shall be appointed as follows:—each of the London, the Liverpool, and the Manchester Districts shall appoint one Examiner from among the Ministers elected by it as Members of the Examination Committee; thus providing two Examiners for each of its two Sections.

8. The Rev. Charles H. Kelly and the General Secretary of the Theological Institution are appointed General Secretaries of the Examination Committee for this year.

9. The Local Secretary of the Richmond Branch of the Theological Institution, and the Rev Jacob Stephenson, B.A., are appointed to act as Examination Secretaries for the Southern Section; and the Local Secretary of the Didsbury Branch, and the Rev. John S. Banks, to act as Examination Secretaries for the Northern Section.

10. The Conference repeats its direction, that arrangements shall be made by the May District Meetings for the hearing of each Candidate by one Minister of the District, in addition to those who have heard him before his recommendation by the District Committee, such Minister to forward his Report to the General Secretaries of the Examination Committee.

EDUCATION.

Q. XXI. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of WESLEYAN EDUCATION ?

A. 1. The Conference adopts the Report and Resolutions of the Education Committee of Review, held in Sheffield, on Friday, July 23rd, 1875; and directs that they be printed in the Minutes. (See Appendix, No. X., 1875.)

2. Believing that there are many places in England in which it is practicable to establish, with great advantage to the Connexion, self-supporting Middle-Class Schools, of a superior order, and conducted on Methodist principles ;—(1) the Conference approves and adopts the following GENERAL REGULATIONS for the establishment and working of such Schools, it being understood that the Education Committee will afford advice, from time to time, respecting the establishment, organization, and management of such Schools :---

1. Each School shall be under the direction of a Board of Managers, three-fourths of whom shall at the time of the constitution of the said Board be members of the Wesleyan-Methodist Society; and any vacancies in the Board shall be so filled up that the proportion of members of Society upon it shall not fall below two-thirds.

11. The Board of Managers shall have power to fill up any vacancy which may be created by the death of a Manager, or by the retirement of a Manager with the consent of the Board.

111. The Superintendent Minister, for the time being, of the Circuit with which the School is connected, (or, in his absence, one of his colleagues, whom he shall depute,) shall be, *cx officio*, entitled to a place and vote at all meetings of the said Board of Managers, and to act as its Chairman.

IV. Proper accounts of each School shall be kept, and duly audited once in every year; and a statement of the general and financial condition of the School shall be annually presented to the March Quarterly Meeting of the Circuit with which the School is connected.

v. As these Schools cannot receive aid from Government Grants, they shall be established and maintained on the principle of self-support.

vi. Any profits which may accrue after payment of the cost of the outfit and maintenance of any School, shall be applied to the improvement or extension of the School in which they have been gained, or towards the creation or assistance of similar Schools; or, if this be not considered expedient by the Board of Managers, the said profits shall be devoted to the purposes of the Wesleyan Education Committee, or to such other purposes as that Committee, with the Board of Managers, may approve.

VII. Any property, real or personal, given to or purchased by the Managers for School-purposes, shall be held by them upon trust for the School; and any moneys given for such purposes, and not required for immediate expenditure, shall be suitably invested by the Managers, who shall dispose of the annual proceeds thereof in harmony with the foregoing Regulation.

VIII. These Schools shall be open to the children of parents of any religious community, but the truths and duties of Christianity, as held by the Wesleyan-Methodist Connexion, shall be taught in the Schools; and they shall be visited by the Ministers of the Circuit with which they are connected. IX. Except in special cases, the Schools shall be in the charge of trained and certificated Teachers.

x. Provision shall be made for the Annual Examination of the Schools by competent and independent Examiners.

x1. The principal Teachers of the Schools shall be Members of the Wesleyan-Methodist Society.

XII. If the Board of Managers of any School shall at any time be of opinion, after consultation with the Wesleyan Education Committee, that it is undesirable any longer to carry on the School, it may be closed by the Managers, who may dispose of the School effects, and of any moneys held by them for the School, in such manner, consistently with the terms of their trust, as they, with the concurrence of the Wesleyan Education Committee, shall determine.

(2.) The Conference recommends that, upon the establishment of any such Middle-Class School, the "Declaration of Managers," which has been prepared by the Education Committee, (see Appendix, No. X., 1875, p. 789,) be adopted, and duly signed by each of the Managers of the School.

(3.) The Conference also resolves as follows :----

a. Where suitable buildings are not at once to be erected for the Schools proposed, use should be made, if possible, of existing premises belonging to the Connexion.

b. When any premises are purchased, given, or erected for the purposes of such a School, the Conference directs that a Trust Deed be very carefully framed in harmony with the foregoing GENERAL REGULATIONS.

c. The Schools contemplated will be Day-Schools, but accommodation for Boarders may (with the consent of the Managers) be provided by, and in the house of, the Head Teacher, or the Sccond Teacher, whether Master or Mistress.

d. The cost of the Outfit and Initial Expenses of each School may be obtained—either on Loan by the Board of Managers at suitable interest (to be repaid out of the annual proceeds of the School), or by Subscription (supplemented, if necessary, by a Loan as above).

e. The curriculum of each School should include:—Ordinary English subjects, Art and Science subjects, Latin, French, German, Music, and Drill.

f. The Staff of each School should consist of (i.) a Head Master or Mistress (certificated, except in special cases); (ii.) a Trained Teacher for every forty Scholars; (iii.) Visiting Teachers, to instruct in German, French, and Music.

 General Principles recommended by the Conference of 1827, for the regulation of Wesleyan-Methodist Sunday-Schools, shall form the permanent basis for the management of such Schools; and in harmony therewith the following Draft of General Rules adopted by the Conference of 1873, is affectionately commended to the adoption of the Committees of our Sunday-Schools throughout the Connexion."

4. The Conference directs that the Statistics of the Day and Sunday Schools of each Circuit be read in the March Quarterly Meeting, but that if sufficient time be not available for the discussion of the Statistics and for inquiry into the state of the Schools, such discussion and inquiry shall take place in the June Quarterly Meeting.

5. The Conference directs that the Education Schedules, having been duly filled up and presented to the March Quarterly Meeting, shall be sent by the Superintendents to the Education Secretary of the District, not later than April 10th.

6. The Conference directs all who are contemplating the crection or alteration of premises, for the establishment of new Schools, to communicate with the Education Committee, for the purpose of receiving counsel as to their projected undertakings, and the adaptation of the premises to the system of instruction designed to be adopted.

7 (1) In view of the interpretation which is put upon Section XXIII. of the Elementary Education Act by the Lords of the Committee of Council, to the effect that any transfer of a School, settled upon our School Model Deed No. I., to a School Board, for any term whatever, for the purposes of such School Board, must be sanctioned not only by the signatures of the Trustees, but by the Conference, testified by the President in writing, the Conference directs that in every case in which the transfer of such a School is proposed, the Superintendent, with the Managers and Trustees acting in concert, shall first consult the Education Committee on the subject, and that if, for reasons given, that Committee recommends such a transfer, the rules of the Conference in relation to the sale of Trust Property shall be applicable thereto :- the Education Committee considering all questions affecting School management, and the Chapel Committee questions affecting Trust Property -(2.) In respect to Schools settled on the School Model Deed No. IL, or on any other Deed in which the consent of the Conference is rendered necessary for the alienation of the property, the Conference recommends the Trustees to act upon the same principles as those laid down in the foregoing clause in relation to Schools settled on the School Model Deed No. I .- (3.) In all cases of transfer which may hereafter occur, the Conference recommends that provision be made in the instrument of transfer to secure the resumption of the premises by the Trustees without their being required to reimburse any money laid out upon them by the School Board solely for its own purposes.

8. The thanks of the Conference are presented to the REV JAMES H. RIGG, D.D., Principal of Westminster Training College; the REV. GEORGE W OLVER, B.A., Principal of Southlands Training College; the REV. THEOPHILUS WOOLMER and Mr. ISAAC HOYLE, the Treasurers; the REV. GEORGE O. BATE, the Secretary of the Education Committee; and the REV. T. BOWMAN STEPHENSON, B.A., Principal of the Children's Home, for their diligent and faithful services during the year.

9. The hearty thanks of the Conference are presented to the REV. JOHN CLULOW, for the very valuable services which he has rendered to this Department of our Connexional Work during the last eleven years, and records its high appreciation of the assiduity and ability with which he has laboured to promote the efficiency of Wesleyan-Methodist Day and Sunday Schools.

10. The REV. THEOPHILUS WOOLMER and Mr. ISAAC HOYLE are re-appointed the Treasurers of the Education Fund; and the REV. GEORGE O. BATE is re-appointed the Secretary of the Committee. Mr. BATE is also appointed the Deputy Treasurer.

11. The REV. CHARLES H. KELLY is appointed the Secretary of the Connexional Sunday-School Union.

13. The Education Committee of Review shall meet in Nottingham, on the Friday preceding the next Conference, and, in addition to the Committee above-named, shall consist of so many of the District Education Secretaries as shall have permission to attend the ensuing Conference; thirty Ministers and thirty Laymen from the Nottingham and Derby, Birmingham, Macelesfield, Lincoln, and Sheffield Districts, together with those Gentlemen who may be chosen by the lay members of the District Committees at the May District Meetings in Great Britain, to attend the Annual Meeting of the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund Committee, preparatory to the Conference.

14. To complete the organization of the Connexional Sunday-School Union, the Conference recommends the formation of District Sunday-School Sub-Committees, the object, constitution, and functions of which shall be as follows :--

(1.) Object:—To promote the interests of the Wesleyan Sunday-Schools of the District, in harmony with the plans of the Connexional Sunday-School Union.

(11.) Constitution:—The Sub-Committee shall eonsist of the Chairman of the District, the District Education Secretary (who shall act as Secretary of the Sub-Committee), another Minister, and three Laymen, being Members of Society, who shall be elected by the District Committee in September. One lay member shall retire annually by rotation. The lay members shall be members of the District Committee during the transaction of Financial and Statistical Affairs.

In the constitution of this Committee due regard shall be had to Provincial Centres and Circuit Unions which may exist in the District, and to the sceuring of the services of Ministers and Laymen who have taken an active interest in Sunday-School work.

(III.) Functions :---1. To meet before, or during, the sittings of the District Committee in May; to receive, through the District Education Secretary, the Circuit Sunday-School Schedules and Reports, and the Reports and Balance-sheets of the Provincial Centres and Book Depôts; to report thereon, and on the Sunday-School work of the District generally, to the District Meeting, and to make such suggestions to it as they may think desirable.

2. To aet during the year as a District Branch Committee of the Connexional Sunday-School Union; to further the objects contemplated in the Union Scheme, including measures for securing better spiritual results, the formation of Provincial Centres and Circuit Unions, and "the oceasional holding of meetings for conference on Sunday-School topics." Such action shall be taken only after consultation with the Superintendents of the Circuits concerned, and in concert with the respective Committees of any Provincial Centres, or Circuit Unions, which may exist, and whose interests may be affected.

3. To render such aid as may be advisable in competitive examinations of teachers and scholars.

15. The Conference approves the following recommendations of the Education Committee in reference to the Committee of Management of Provincial Centres of the Connexional Sunday-School Union :—

1 The electing body of the Committee of Management shall consist of the Ministers of all the Circuits included in the area of the operations of the Centre; and a representative chosen by the Committee of each Sunday-School connected with the Union in these Circuits. This electing body shall be convened annually by the existing Committee of the Centre.

2. The Committee of Management shall consist of not fewer than ten persons, the number to be decided by the electing body The Superintendent Ministers of Circuits connected with the Centre shall be, ex officio, Members of the Committee, one of whom shall act as its Chairman. The rest of the Committee shall be elected, in such manner as the electing body shall determine, from among the other Circuit Ministers, and resident members of the Wesleyan-Methodist Society, whom the electing body consider most likely to manage the various interests of the Centre with efficiency. The Committee of the Centre, as thus formed, shall, at its first meeting, elect a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, a Ministerial and a Lay Secretary, and a Treasurer: and shall appoint such Sub-Committees of Finance, etc., as may be deemed desirable. A proportion of the Centre Committee (to be fixed by the electing body) shall retire annually, the retiring members to be eligible for re-election. The Committee shall decide when and where its meetings shall be held, and what number of its members shall form a quorum. The electing body shall annually appoint two Auditors of all accounts of the Centre, including those of the Depot or Agency; but such Auditors shall not be members of the Centre Committee. The Managing Committee of each Centre shall prepare an Annual Report of its proceedings, and forward it, with the Balance-sheet or Balancesheets as audited, to the District Sunday-School Sub-Committee

THE CHILDREN'S HOME.

Q. XXII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of the CHILDREN'S HOME ?

A. 1. The Conference receives with pleasure the Report of the Children's Home, and directs that an Abstract of it be printed in the Minutes. (See Appendix, No. X., 1875, page 793.)

2. The Conference is gratified that the liberality of the Christian public generally, and especially of Sunday-School teachers and scholars, has abounded towards this work; and it expresses its thankfulness that many of the children of the Home have given signs of a true work of grace in their hearts.

3. The Conference learns with pleasure that a certified Training Ship for boys is likely to be placed upon the Thames, and that the Government have put a ship at the disposal of a Provisional Committee, formed to secure and equip a vessel for this purpose, and approves of the proposal that the Committee of the Children's Home shall undertake the management of this ship, as soon as the cost of its equipment has been defrayed by the Provisional Committee.

Q. XXIII. What are the Resolutions of the Conference on the subject of HIGHER EDUCATION ?

A. 1. The Conference appoints the following Committee to com-

plete the arrangements for the improvement of Wesleyan-Methodist Trust-Property in Oxford (see Minutes, 1874, p. 443 of this Volume); viz., —the President and the Secretary of the Conference. the Ex-President, the Rev. William Arthur, M.A., Benjamin Frankland, B.A., Frederic Greeves, John W Greeves, John Hearnshaw. Dr. James, Ebenezer E. Jenkins, M.A., Joshua Mason, Dr. Moulton, George W Olver, B.A., George T Perks, M.A., Dr. Rigg, Dr. Stamp, T. Bowman Stephenson, B.A., Frederick F. Woolley, and Robert N. Young; with Messrs. J. S. Budgett. T. P Bunting, J. C. Clark, M.P., W. Edmunds, Henry French, B.A., Thomas Hazlehurst, Elkanah Healey, Isaac Hoyle, Sir Francis Lycett, Alexander M'Arthur, M.P., W M'Arthur, M.P., J. H. The REV. GEORGE W OLVER, B.A., is appointed the Secretary of this Committee.

2. The Conference receives with satisfaction the Reports presented to it by the Ex-President and the Rev. GEORGE W. OLVEE, B.A., on the subject of the Leys School, Cambridge (see Appendix No. XII., 1875); and approves the Scheme of Trusts of that School, a printed copy of which, signed by the Rev. GEORGE W OLVEE, B.A., the Rev W MORLEY PUNSHON, LL.D., the Rev. GEORGE T. PERKS, M.A., and the Rev GERVASE SMITH, M.A., was presented to the Conference, as a Scheme of Trusts for Educational Purposes connected with, and under the direction of, the Conference, and for their own Connexional purposes only, and no other ; and the Conference directs that the Leys School shall be conveyed and held upon the Trusts of the said Scheme.

3. The Conference further directs the Trustees, in case the Governing Body shall, at any time, procure incorporation pursuant to Clause 12 of the Scheme, and shall require property of the foundation to be vested in them, to convey the School-property to the Governing Body

4. The Conference accedes to the request of the Governing Body, to re-appoint the REV. DR. MOULTON to promote the objects of the School.

RELIGIOUS OBSERVANCE OF THE LORD'S DAY.

Q. XXIV What are the Resolutions of the Conference on receiving the Report of the LORD'S-DAY COMMITTER?

A. 1. The Conference, in accepting the Report now read, repeats its expression of devout gratitude to Almighty God, that attempts made to lower the standard of Sabbath observance in this country continue to be ineffectual, so far as legislation is concerned; but considers that the frequency of such attempts makes it more than ever necessary to guard the sanctity of Lord's Day by the full force of godly example; to persevere in the use of all proper means for preventing any further legal sanction of Sabbath-breaking; to instruct our congregations yet more explicitly in the Divine institution and universal obligation of the Sabbath, of which Christ is Lord; and ever to seek in prayer the blessing of Almighty God on their endeavours.

2. The Conference is persuaded that it is the duty of a Christian nation to confess its allegiance to Almighty God, and its faith in a Divine Redeemer, by honouring in every proper manner this Divine institution; by discouraging and repressing open inroads upon its sacred duties, and by doing everything in its power to defend, mildly but firmly, the Christian Sabbath from public profanation, so as not to interfere with the consciences of individuals in their private sentiments and conduct. The Conference further considers that the British Legislature is bound to afford this protection, inasmuch as the Divine authority of the Lord's Day has ever been admitted and acknowledged by the law of the land, however particular enactments may have fallen into disuse, or become ineffective.

3. The thanks of the Conference are presented to the REV. GEORGE MAUNDER and the REV. JOHN BAKER, M.A., for their faithful services during the past year, and they are re-appointed the Secretaries of the Lord's Day Committee for the ensuing year.

EXAMINATION OF PREACHERS ON TRIAL

Q. XXV What directions does the Conference give concerning the Examination of PREACHERS ON TRIAL ?

A. 1. The Conference resolves :---

(1.) That the Examination of Preachers on Trial shall be conducted by a Connexional Board of Examiners, to consist of one Examiner in each subject contained in the course of reading prescribed for the four years of probation.

(2.) That in addition to the Probationers' Examination Committee, two General Examination Secretaries shall be appointed from among Ministers stationed in the town.

(3.) That arrangements shall be made, at each Financial District Meeting, for a Central Examination of Preachers on Trial in each District, or more than one if necessary; at which Central Examination or Examinations the Probationers in that District shall attend. In the event of any Preacher on Trial being unable to pay the necessary travelling expenses, they shall be defrayed, together with other expenses of the Examination, from the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund, and from the Theological Institution Fund, in such proportions as the Committees of those Funds may decide.

(4.) That at each Financial District Meeting, a District Probationers' Examination Secretary shall be appointed, or more than one, so as to provide a Secretary to take charge of each Central Examination in the District; and that the District Secretary shall be held responsible for the efficient conduct of the Central Examination. Full and clear instructions as to the course to be pursued are to be forwarded to the District Secretaries by the General Secretaries.

(5.) That the Examination shall take place throughout the Connexion on the same day in the first week of April.

(6.) That the Examination-Papers, prepared under the direction of the Committee, shall be sent by the General Secretaries to each District Examination Secretary, whose duty it shall be to distribute them at the Central Examination, and by the earliest post transmit to the General Secretaries the Papers written by the several Probationers at those Examinations.

(7.) That the Probationers' Papers shall be forwarded by the General Secretaries to the Examiners for valuation, and that each Fxaminer shall send to them the results of his valuation of the f(x)

Papers shown by numbers, together with any remarks upon them which he may think desirable. In the case of the North and South Wales Districts, such variations from the foregoing arrangements are permitted as the Examination Secretaries find necessary.

(8.) That the General Secretaries shall compile from the returns of the Examiners a complete Report upon the reading of each Probationer, and forward it to the District Examination Secretary, to be presented by him to the May District Meeting, together with such remarks on the Examination of the Preachers on Trial in the District as he may think desirable.

(9.) That the General Secretaries shall prepare and present to the Conference a General Report upon the Examination of the Preachers on Trial.

2. The following Ministers are appointed the Probationers' Examination Committee; viz., The Theological and Classical Tutors of the three Branches of the Theological Institution, the two General Examination Secretaries, the REV. W F. MOULTON, D.D., and the REV. GEORGE W OLVER, B.A. The REV. DR. MOULTON is re-appointed the Secretary of this Committee.

3. The REV. JOHN WOOD, B.A., and the REV. GEORGE O. BATE, are re-appointed the two General Examination Secretaries.

RESOLUTIONS RESPECTING TEMPERANCE.

The Report of the Committee on Temperance having been presented and adopted, the Conference resolves :---

I That a Temperance Committee be appointed, from year to year, consisting of Ministers and Laymen, both abstainers and non-abstainers, to act in harmony with the acknowledged discipline of the Connexion, and specially with the functions of the Committees of Privileges and Exigency.

2. That it be the duty of this Committee to watch legislation as affecting the evils of intemperance, to collect and circulate information in such ways as it may deem advisable, and generally to take such action in accordance with the first of these resolutions as circumstances may require; and to report annually to the Conference, with such suggestions as, from time to time, it may think expedient.

3. That the Committee hereafter appointed be instructed to

consider during the coming year, whether any, and, if any, what Circuit organization should be recommended.

4. The Conference sanctions the formation of Bands of Hope in connection with Sunday-Schools, and under the supervision of the Ministers of the Circuit and the Local Sunday-School Committees; and directs that the number of such Bands of Hope shall be annually reported to the Conference.

5. The Conference resolves that, in future, the Representative of each District shall send to the Secretary of the Conference, not later than the 5th day of July in each year, upon a Schedule to be provided by him, complete lists of (1) the arrangements provisionally made for the Stationing of Ministers in his District, (2) the invitations accepted by Ministers in his District to Circuits in other Districts, and (3) all Ministers in his District for whom no arrangement has been made ;—that from these lists the Secretary of the Conference shall compile, and cause to be printed, in a convenient form for use in the Stationing Committee, one complete list of all arrangements thus provisionally made, and a separate list of all Ministers for whom provisional arrangements have not been made; and that a copy of these lists shall be sent to each member of the Stationing Committee at least seven days before the meeting of that Committee.

RE-ARRANGEMENT OF DISTRICTS.

The Conference resolves, that those parts of the Report on the re-arrangement of Districts which have been approved by the several Districts concerned, or by a majority of them, shall be referred to the following Committee for further consideration, which shall report to the next Conference, viz.,—The President and the Secretary of the Conference, the Ex-President, the Revs. Dr. Osborn, Dr. Stamp, John Bedford, John Rattenbury, George T Perks, M.A., Dr. James, Dr. Rigg, Marmaduke C. Osborn, John W Greeves, William T Radcliffe, John V B. Shrewsbury, Theophilus Woolmer, John M'Kenny, Benjamin Browne, Joseph Hargreaves, Robert N. Young, Edwin H. Tindall, and George Bowden, Convener.

REVISION OF THE LITURGY AND THE BOOK OF OFFICES.

The Committee which was appointed last year to consider the subject of the Revision of the Liturgy and the Book of Offices presented its Report, which is received by the Conference. The Committee is re-appointed, and allowed to meet again.

CONSTITUTION OF THE COMMITTEES OF REVIEW, AND LAY-REPRESENTATION.

On these subjects the Conference resolves as follows :---

1. The Conference is of opinion that the time is approaching when a comprehensive plan should be devised for some direct and adequate representation of the Laity in the transaction of the business of the Conference, in consistency with the recognised principles of our economy, and the provisions of the Deed Poll : but the difficulties which present themselves, after much deliberation, are so serious that the Conference resolves to appoint two Committees to further consider the whole subject, and empowers the first-named of these Committees to take such counsel as they may judge expedient on the legal aspects of the case.

2. To carry out the previous Resolution, the Conference appoints a Committee of Ministers, consisting of the persons hereinafter named, together with one Minister to be chosen by the Ministers of each District, assembled in the Financial District This Committee shall carefully consider the whole Meetings. subject, and lay their Report before the Ministers when assembled in the Annual District Meetings, and before the Conference. The Ministers above referred to, who are now appointed by the Conference, are the President, the Ex-President, and the Secretary of the Conference, the Revs. John Lomas, John Farrar, Dr. Stamp, Dr. Osborn, John Rattenbury, William Arthur, M.A., Charles Prest, John Bedford, Dr. Jobson, Dr. James, George T. Perks, M.A., William B. Pope, Alexander M'Anlay, Dr. Rigg, George W Olver, B.A., Marmaduke C. Osborn, T. Bowman Stephenson, B.A., Henry W. 3. The Conference further appoints a mixed Committee, consisting of the Ministers constituting the Committee just mentioned, together with the following Gentlemen, viz. ----Messrs. Before this Committee shall be laid the Report of the Ministerial Committee, with the observations of the several District Committees; and this Mixed Committee shall prepare a Report thereon, which shall be submitted, together with the other Reports, to the next Conference.

The Rev. Robert N. Young is the Convener of the aforesaid Committees, to whom all communications are to be addressed.

LAY-REPRESENTATION IN THE IRISH CONFERENCE.

On this subject the Conference resolves as follows ; viz.,-

1. The Conference having appointed Committees to consider the question of Lay-Representation, which Committees cannot report until the Conference of 1876, feels itself unable to enter into a full consideration of the proposals of the Irish Conference at present, and therefore regrets to be under the necessity of postponing the question for another year.

2. The Conference further resolves, that the Committee appointed by the Irish Conference to consider this question shall be incorporated with the Committee to which this Conference has now confided the question.

PASTORAL OVERSIGHT OF THE YOUNG.

The Conference adopts the Report of the Committee appointed to consider this subject. (See Appendix, No. XIII., 1875.)

The Conference further resolves :---

1. That the Resolution of 1838, modified by the insertion of the words "wherever practicable," be reprinted, so as to read as follows:—The preachers are solemnly enjoined to hold. wherever practicable, regular weekly meetings with the children of our people, under the age of fourteen, on the most convenient day of the week, in every town where a preacher has his stated residence, according to our ancient rule and practice.

2. That inquiry be made in Ministers' Meetings, and in the May District Meetings, respecting the observance of this regulation, in connection with the question inserted in the Schelule sent by the President to Superintendents.

3. That a Committee shall be nominated by the President to consider this subject further, which shall be convened at the discretion of the President.

PRAYER ON BEHALF OF SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

The Conference commends to the attention of Ministers and the Officers of our Sinday-Schools, the suggestion of the Sunday-School Union, that certain specified days should be set apart for special prayer on behalf of the Sunday-Schools throughout the land.

THE STATUS OF COMMUNICANTS.

The Committee appointed by the last Conference to consider the status of Communicants having reported that the Resolutions adopted by the several District Committees indicate the existence of very great diversity of opinion on the subject, the Conference is not prepared at present to proceed to any new legislation.

MEMORIALS TO THE CONFERENCE.

The Conference resolves that, in order that Memorials from Circuit Quarterly Meetings to the Conference may be received, the directions of the Conference respecting such Memorials contained in the Minutes for 1852 and 1874 must be observed.

LOCAL PREACHERS.

The Conference receives the Report of the Committee appointed to consider the means of assisting Local Preachers in preparation for their important work, and directs that the Resolutions of the Committee be forwarded to the May District Meetings for consideration, when Ministers only are present; and that the Minutes on these Resolutions shall be transmitted to the Rer. George Bowden, with a view to their being considered by the Committee.

METROPOLITAN METHODIST LAY MISSION, 1875.

The Conference receives the Report of the Metropolitan Methodist Lay Mission, and repeats the Resolution of 1873, viz.:--

The Conference, recognising the great need that exists for Lay Mission work, and the special and pressing claims which London has upon the entire country, commends this movement to the liberal support of the whole Connexion.

MANCHESTER AND SALFORD LAY MISSION.

1. The Conference receives the Report of this Mission with satisfaction, and rejoices in the degree of success with which it has pleased God to bless the Mission.

2. The Conference directs that the ensuing Financial Meeting of the Manchester District shall appoint a Committee for the management of the Mission during the year.

3. The Lay Treasurers of this Mission shall be members of the Manchester District Meeting, when financial and general affairs are under consideration.

PROPOSED ERECTION OF CENTRAL PREMISES IN MANCHESTER.

The Conference cordially approves of the scheme for the erection of central premises in Manchester, for Local and Conlexional purposes; and gives permission to the promoters to obtain donations from friends in the Manchester, Bolton, and Macclesfield Districts, and from others who by business or relaionship are, or have been, connected with those Districts, for he carrying of the scheme into effect.

IMPROVEMENTS IN THE NEW KINGSWOOD AND WOODHOUSE GROVE SCHOOL.

The Conference, on receiving the Report of the Special Comnittee, resolves :---

That considering the difficulties attending any immediate ecision of the question, it is expedient to defer for the present taking any steps towards the concentration of the Schools in one locality.

The Conference accepts the scheme for the management of the Kingswood and Woodhouse Grove School, as submitted by the Special Committee. (See Appendix, No. III. Part II., 1875.) The Committee (or Governing Body) of the School to take any steps they may deem necessary to give legal validity to the scheme, and for that purpose to modify the Trusts of the Schools and Scholarships; and it authorises the President, the Ex-President, and the Secretary of the Conference, to sanction, in the name and on bchalf of the Conference, any changes in the scheme which the Charity Commissioners may suggest, and the Committee approve.

The Conference resolves that the following Ministers and Gentlemen shall form the first Committee, or Governing Body:-

The President, Ex-President, and Secretary of the Conference, the General Treasurers and General Secretaries of the Schools' Fund, the General Treasurers and the General Secretary of the Children's Fund, the Chairman for the time being of the Leeds. Halifax and Bradford, Bristol, and Bath Distriets, respectively, the Governors and Head-Master of the School for the time being, who shall be Members, ex officio: with the Revs. John Bedford, Frederic Greeves, Benjamin Gregory, Benjamin Hellier, Dr. James, Dr. Moulton, George W Olver, B.A., Dr. Rizz, William O. Simpson, William J. Tweddle, Robert N. Young; and Messrs. Henry W Blackburn, S. Budgett, P. W Bunting, B.A., T. P. Bunting, Henry H. Fowler, Edward Holden, Isaac Hoyle, William Hunt, Henry Jefferson, M.A., George Lidgett, B.A., Alexander M'Arthur, M.P., Henry Mitchell, and Alfred Sharpe.

The Conference appoints Mr. Thomas G. Osborn, M.A., Head-Master of Kingswood and Woodhouse Grove School.

The cordial thanks of the Conference are presented to the Rev. Robert N. Young, the Secretary of the Special Committee, for his able and efficient management of the business of the Committee during the year.

INTERFERENCE OF MINISTERS IN POLITICAL MATTERS.

After eareful consideration of this subject, the Conference resolves as follows :---

The Conference recognises on the one hand the individual freedom of its Ministers as Christian citizens, and on the other hand their responsibility to each other and the Conference as members of a non-political Body, and confides in their loyalty and honour so to regulate and control their public action as not to imperil the unity of the Ministerial Brotherhood, or disturb the peace of the Connexion at large.

MINISTERIAL APPOINTMENTS TO DEPARTMENTAL OFFICES.

The Conference resolves that in all cases in which a Ministerial appointment is to be made to any Departmental Office, the Committee concerned in recommending the appointment shall send at least three names to the Conference for selection, the vote, as before, to be taken by Ballot.

MINISTERS' CHILDREN'S ASSOCIATION.

The Conference is gratified to learn that an Association has been formed, the object of which is to afford pecuniary aid to the children, especially the daughters, of Wesleyan-Methodist Ministers, whose cases, after careful inquiry, prove deserving, to endeavour to procure the admission of Orphan and afflicted Children of Wesleyan Ministers into the Public Institutions of the country, where the Connexional Schools and Funds are not available,—to assist the sons and daughters of Ministers to obtain suitable situations,—and generally to promote their social, educational, and religious interests as opportunity may occur.

The Conference believes that such an Association may prove of great benefit to those whose welfarc it specially contemplates, and earnestly hopes that it will secure the sympathy and support of the sons and daughters of Wesleyan Ministers.

EVANGELISTIC SERVICES OF MESSRS. MOODY AND SANKEY.

The Conference recognises the hand of the Lord in the recent visit of the American Evangelists, Messrs. Moody and Sankey, to this country, and rejoices in the wide and eminent success with which their labours have been crowned, in the revival of the spiritual life of the Churches, in the conversion of a great multitude of souls, and in awakening a sympathy with the Gospel among large masses of our population.

The Conference directs that a copy of this resolution shall be forwarded to Messrs. Moody and Sankey.

UNITY OF THE CHURCH OF CHRIST.

The Conference, desirous that the real and actually subsisting unity of the Church of Christ should be promoted and manifested by all practicable means, records its readiness to recognise, and reciprocate the recognition of, all Churches which hold the fundamentals of the Christian faith.

BURIAL IN CHURCHYARDS.

The Conference expresses its sympathy with the endeavour to amend the laws affecting the Burial of Nonconformists in Parochial Churchyards; and commends the consideration of any measure bearing on this object, which may be brought before Parliament, to the Committee of Exigency.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES ACTS.

The Conference re-affirms its profound and religious disapproval of the Contagious Diseases Acts, declaring them to be iniquitous in principle and demoralizing in tendency. The Conference approves of all lawful and prudent efforts to secure their repeal, and prays that such efforts may be speedily successful.

THE RELATION OF THE SCHOOLS' FUND, AND THE CHILDREN'S FUND.

The Conference resolves :---

1. That the question of the Amalgamation of the Schools' Fund and the Children's Fund be referred to a small Committee, consisting of the President and the Secretary of the Conference, the Ex-President, the officers of the two Funds, the Revs. John Bedford, Dr. Stamp, Dr Rigg, John W Greeves, Robert N. Young, and Dr. Moulton; with Messrs. T. P Bunting, Henry H. Fowler, Frederick Ingoldby, George Lidgett, B.A., and the Rev. Henry J. Pope, Convener; that this Committee shall meet in the course of the year, and present its Report to the next Conference through the General Schools' Committee.

2. That the Wesleyan Missionary Society shall pay for the children of the Missionaries in the Connexional Schools the ascertained cost which they bring upon the Fund.

3. That in consideration of the present state of the Schools' Fund, and the prospective diminution of the balance of the Children's Fund, and more especially in consideration of the establishment of the Schools for Ministers' Daughters, for which no appeal has been made to the Connexion, it is imperatively necessary that a vigorous effort should be made to increase the Subscriptions and public Collections.

4. That the claims of the Schools' Fund shall be laid before the Ministers themselves, with a view to the obtaining of Annual Subscriptions from amongst them.

DISTRICT SUSTENTATION FUNDS.

The Conference directs that when in any District a Sustentation Fund is formed under the Connexional Regulations, the Treasure shall be a member of Society, shall be elected by the District Committee, and shall be, *ex officio*, a member of that Committee during the transaction of Financial and Statistical Affairs.

MISCELLANEOUS RESOLUTIONS.

1. Thanks to the retiring President.—Resolved unanimously, That the respectful and affectionate thanks of the Conference are due, and are hereby presented, to its late President, the REV. W MORLEY PUNSHON, LL.D., for the distinguished ability, fidelity, and zeal with which he has discharged his official duties, both during the Session of the last Conference and throughout the year.

2. Thanks to the Secretary.—Resolved unanimously, That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the REV. GERVASE SMITH, M.A., for his able and acceptable services as the Secretary of the Conference.

3. The Ex-President's Sermon.—Resolved unanimously, That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the Ex-President, the REV. W MORLEY PUNSHON, LL.D., for the eminently appropriate, powerful, and eloquent Discourse which he delivered on Sunday morning, August 1st; and that he be earnestly requested to publish it.

4. The President's Sermon.—Resolved unanimously, That the respectful thanks of the Conference be presented to the President, the REV. GERVASE SMITH, M.A., for the seasonable, faithful, and powerful Sermon which he delivered on Sunday evening, August 1st; and that he be earnestly requested to publish it.

5. The Ex-President's Charge.—Resolved unanimously, That the eordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the Ex-President, the REV. W MORLEY PUNSHON, LL.D., for the comprehensive, powerful, and eloquent Charge addressed by him to one division of the newly-ordained Ministers; and that he be carnestly requested to publish it.

6. Charge of the Rev. George T. Perks.—Resolved unanimously, That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the REV. GEORGE T. PERKS, M.A., for the able, weighty, and seasonable Charge delivered by him to the second division of the newly-ordained Ministers; and that he be respectfully requested to publish it.

7 Suggestions from District Meetings.—It is resolved, That the Convener of the Conference Committee on Memorials from Circuits and Suggestions from District Meetings, is authorised to obtain, immediately after the Annual District Meetings, from the Secretaries of the District Committees, copies of any Suggestions which may have been made, and that nothing shall be deemed to be a Suggestion of a District Meeting but what is recorded in answer to the Question on the subject in the District Minutes.

The REV. FRANCIS W GREEVES is rc-appointed the Convener of the Committee referred to.

8. It is resolved that the Annual Meetings of the several District Committees shall be held between the 14th and the 21st of May, 1876, with the exception of the Lincoln, North Wales, South Wales, Isle of Man, and Zetland Districts.

STANDING ORDERS.

1. Home-Missionary Ministers. — (1.) At each Financial District Meeting a return shall be made, from each Circuit in which a Home-Missionary Minister is stationed, of the sum contributed by the Circuit to the Home-Mission Fund, and of the cost of such appointment to the Home-Mission Committee, according to the "Regulations for the employment of Home-Missionary Ministers" adopted by the Conference of 1859.

(2.) The Conference directs that a special inquiry shall be made at the May District Meetings, whether the Regulations for the employment of Home-Missionary Ministers, adopted by the Conference, have been faithfully observed in the Circuits to which Home-Missionary Ministers are appointed; and that a Report in each case shall be made to the Conference.

2. Candidates for Ordination.—The Conference directs that Candidates for Ordination shall, at or before the May District Meeting, preach before three Ministers of the District, who shall report to the Meeting.

3. Preachers on Trial.—(1.) The Conference, having been informed that, in several Circuits, the Preachers on Trial have very rarely an opportunity of receiving the Lord's Supper, resolves that, in compliance with a former injunction on this subject, the Superintendents be required to make the necessary arrangements, in their Circuit-Plans, for securing to their junior Colleagues proper facilities for partaking of this Holy Saerament. (2.) Whenever it shall be found to be practicable, Preachers on Trial shall preach during the District Meetings.

4. Candidates for Admission on Trial.—Those Preachers who are recommended for admission on Trial shall preach in the presence of at least three of the Ministers of the District Committee, (at or about the time of its Annual Meeting in May.) to be selected by the Chairman, exclusively of the Superintendents by whom the Candidates respectively are proposed; and a special report of the Sermons shall be made in the District Meeting, and immediately forwarded in writing to the London Committee for the Examination of Candidates.

5. Attendance of Ministers at Official Meetings .-- Mistakes having arisen on this subject, the Conference deems it proper and necessary to declare, that all the Ministers and Preachers on Trial appointed to a Circuit have a constitutional right to take part as members in our Leaders' Meetings, and in all other official meetings of the Circuits to which they are appointed.

6. Minor District Meetings.—In all cases in which the holding of a Minor District Meeting is rendered necessary, such Meeting, except under the Regulation passed by the Conference in 1840, (*Minutes*, Vol. IX., p. 94,) shall be held in the District in which the accused party resides, the accused and the accuser selecting respectively two Ministers from the said District, who, with the Chairman thereof, shall constitute the Minor District Meeting.

Should either party refuse or decline to choose two Ministers, to act as members of the Meeting, the Chairman is empowered and directed to nominate them, so that the number required by rule may be made up.

7. Committee on Appeals and other Cases.—At each Conference, the President shall nominate, not later than the second day, a Committee of twenty-one members of the Conference, to whom shall be referred, without discussion, all cases requiring further inquiry touching the character of Ministers or Preachers on Trial, immediately after the reading of the Minutes of District Committees thereupon, or of any notice of charge or appeal relating thereto, or for any reason which the Conference may deem sufficient.

Any complainant or appellant, or any person under inquiry, may object to one in three of the members of the said Committee sitting on his case; and the President shall then appoint some other member of the Conference to act instead of the member so objected to.

Special Cases to be decided upon by the Conference may be referred to the whole Committee, but it shall, for ordinary purposes, be divided into three sections, for each of which a Convener shall be appointed, who shall be responsible for preparing the business of the Committee.

8. Supply of Vacancies.—Instances having occurred in which Superintendents and other Ministers, needing Circuit-supplies on occasion of sickness and various casualties, have applied to the President of the Conference, without *first* taking counsel with the Chairman of the District; the Conference directs the brethren to return to the old plan of first communicating with the Chairman in every such case.

9. Liverpool Minutes.—The Resolutions adopted by the Conference in the year 1820, and usually called the "Liverpool Minutes," besides being read and considered in the Annual Meeting of each District Committee, (as our standing Regulations require,) shall also be read at the Weekly Meeting of Ministers in each Circuit, next following the September Quarterly Meeting; and the Chairmen of Districts are directed to make inquiry concerning the due observance of this regulation.

10. District Minutes.—The Chairmen of Districts are required to procure three complete copies of the Minutes of the several Annual and other Meetings of the District Committees, transcribed according to the order of time in which such Meetings shall have been held, and duly signed by the Chairman and Secretary. One of these copies shall be inserted in the District Records; a second shall be reserved for the use of the Chairman and Financial Secretary at the Conference; and a third shall be delivered to the Assistant-Secretaries, on the Wednesday preeeding the Conference, and by them to the President during the first week of each Conference, to be preserved under his direction, as a document appertaining to the Connexion. The several copies of the last class shall be written on foolseap paper, that they may be annually bound together in one volume.

11. Annual Return of Members in Society.—The number of Members in Society, and of persons admitted on trial, as taken at the March Quarterly Visitation in each year, and reported in the Circuit Schedules presented at the District Meetings, shall be the number returned on the Minutes of the following Conference.

12. Returns of the Military in attendance at our Chapels.— The Conference directs that the returns of the Military in attendance at our Chapels shall include the actual number of coldiers who are declared Wesleyan-Methodists stationed in the Circuit, and not merely the average number in attendance at Divine Service.

13. Circuit Schedules.—In order to bring the state and progress of the work of God in every Circuit distinctly under the examination of the District Meetings, copies of the Printed Circuit Schedules, duly filled up, shall be annually produced, examined, and considered. The Chairmen of Districts are made responsible for the execution of this order. (See also Minutes for 1831, Q. xxv., Vol. VII., p. 67.)

The Circuit Schedules containing the Returns of the Members in Society are to be forwarded, immediately after the May District Meetings, to the REV. JOHN BOND, 44, Doughty-Street, W.C.

The Education Schedules, having been filled up and presented to the March Quarterly Meeting, are to be sent to the District Educational Secretary, not later than April 10th.

14. Schedules and Circulars on Connexional Business.—As it is obviously desirable, that the Committees appointed by the Conference to manage the several departments of the business of the Connexion, in the intervals of its Session, should be furnished with as much statistical information as possible on the matters of business severally confided to their care, the Conference authorises them, through their appointed Officers, to send, when they deem it expedient, suitable Circulars and Schedules to the Superintendents, or to the Chairmen of Districts, as the case may require; and directs the Superintendents and Chairmen duly to return such Schedules properly filled up.

15. Annual Examination of Pupil-Teachers in Religious Knowledge .- The Conference directs that the Annual Examination of Pupil-Teachers in Religious Knowledge shall be held on the first Saturday in October and March; that the questions shall be prepared by the General Committee; that the Examination shall be held, either in the several Circuits by the Superintendent Ministers or their Colleagues, or at suitable places for Central District Examinations, as may be determined by the September District Meetings, and agreed to by the respective School Committees; and that the written answers shall be forwarded to the General Secretary, and shall be valued by a Central Board of Examiners to be elected by the General Committee. The Conference further recommends that, in connection with Central Examinations, Meetings of Teachers and Pupil-Teachers be held under the direction of the Chairman of the District and the District Educational Secretary.

16. Lay-Members of Connexional Committees.—(1.) At the Annual Meeting of each District Committee in Great Britain, one Gentleman, being a member of the Society, shall be chosen by the Lay-Members of the District Committee, to be a member of the Committee of the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund, held preparatory to the Conference; and the Gentleman so chosen shall have the right to attend, and take part in the proceedings of, the Annual Meetings of the Missionary Committee, the Schools' Committee, the Chapel Committee, the Theological Institution Committee, and the Education Committee, held preparatory to the Conference.

(2.) In respect to the several Committees of the Connexional Funds, it is resolved, That a certain number of Lay Gentlemen shall retire annually by rotation, the same persons being ineligible for immediate re-election, except in special cases.

17. Lay-Members of District Committees to be summoned by the Chairman.-It is resolved, That, in future, the Chairmen of Districts shall be required to send a circular to the Lay-Members of the District Committee, requesting their attendance on the Wednesday, and, if necessary, on the Thursday, in the week of the Annual District Meeting, specifying the business that will be brought forward, and particularly mentioning any subject that may have been particularly remitted by the Conference to the consideration of such Meeting. A similar circular shall be prepared and sent with reference to the Financial District

In order to the carrying out of this Resolution, the Superin-

tendents of Circuits are required to furnish the Chairman of the District with the names and addresses of the Circuit Stewards immediately after the December Quarterly Meeting.

18. Representative to the Stationing Committee.—The Minister who shall be the Representative of each District to the Stationing Committee shall be chosen by the united votes of the Ministers and Laymen who are members of the District Committee.

19. Division of Circuits.—Before District Committees consent to the division of any Circuit, inquiry must be made whether due attention has been paid to satisfactory arrangements for the Trust-Estates affected by the proposed division, especially in reference to any debts existing thereon.

20. Boundaries of Circuits.—Whereas difficulties have arisen from the want of accurate and recorded definitions of the Boundaries of Circuits, the Conference directs that, in future, the Boundaries of Circuits which are divided shall be fully stated in the Minutes of the District Meeting to which they belong, and that the Secretary of the District shall send a copy of the record to be inserted in the Minutes of the Quarterly Meetings of the Circuits eoncerned; and that in such eases eopies of the Ordnance maps, or some other maps, of the localities concerned, be coloured so as to show the boundaries, and deposited in the safes provided for the custody of the Trust-Deeds of the Circuits. The Conference further directs that these arrangements be made in all eases of alteration in the boundaries of existing Circuits.

21. Quarterly Fast - Days. — The days upon which the Quarterly Fast, appointed by Rule, is to be observed throughout the Connexion, for the following year, arc, Fridays, October 1st, 1875, January 7th, March 31st, and June 30th, 1876.

22. Rule of 1797 concerning Admission of Members.— Mistakes having occasionally arisen respecting the meaning of the Rule of 1797, on the subject of the admission of persons who are on trial as Members of our Society, the Conference deems it necessary to repeat the statement, That it never was intended that the names of all those who are on trial should be laid before a Leaders' Meeting for distinct and formal discussion : but solely, that if there be, in the opinion of a Leader, any reasonable objection to the character and conduct of any person who is on trial, such objection may be stated by him; and that, if the validity of the objection be established to the satisfaction of the Meeting, a Member's Ticket shall not be given to the person, so objected to, at the Quarterly Visitation.

23. Trial of Members.—When a charge is brought against any Member resident in a place where no Leaders' Meeting is statedly held, the case shall be referred for investigation to the Leaders' Meeting of the principal Society in the Circuit Town. The Leader or Leaders, and the Society Stewards, of the Society of which the accused is a member, shall be associated with the Leaders' Meeting for the purposes of the investigation.

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If the accused person is a Trustee, then there shall also be associated with the Leaders' Meeting, as above constituted, the Trustees of the Chapel with which the Society of which he is a Member is connected; or, if there is no such Chapel, then the Trustees of the Chapel in connection with the principal Society in the Circuit Town. But no Trustee shall, in either case, be so associated, unless he is himself a Member of Society in the same Circuit.

24. Reading of the Pastoral Address in Society Meetings.— The Superintendents are directed to appoint special Society Meetings to be held at the principal Chapels in their Circuits, for the purpose of having the Pastoral Address read, and made the subject of suitable remarks and exhortations.

25. Contingent Fund.—In future, all payments on account of Ordinary Deficiencies shall be made through the medium of the Financial Secretaries of Districts. The payments on account of Home Missionaries are to be made directly to and by the Treasurers of the Fund.

26. The Army.—The Chairmen of Districts are directed to inquire of the Superintendents of Circuits in which troops are marched to Divine service in our chapels, the average number of non-commissioned officers and men in attendance; distinguishing the number of Members in Society. These returns must include, also, the actual number of soldiers who are declared Wesleyan-Methodists. The returns given are to be recorded in the District Minutes. If there be no military attendance in the District, a note to that effect shall be inserted.

27. Conference Plan.—The Superintendents of those Circuits in which the Conference may from year to year assemble, shall, with the previous approbation of the President, (as already required by Rule,) complete and print, not later than the 15th day of June in each year, a Plan of the order of preaching in the principal chapels during the Session of the Conference; and shall also, on or before the above date, inform every person whom they have appointed to preach in those chapels, of the time and place of such appointment. And in order that the Plan thus prepared may not be violated, to the disappointment of our friends, and to the great inconvenience of other parties concerned, no Minister who attends the Conference shall be at liberty to make an engagement to preach in any other Circuit, either on the Sabbath, or on any other day, during the period appointed for the meeting of the Conference, or of its various Preparatory Committees, at the time for which his name shall be inserted on the Conference Plan.

28. The Chairmen of Districts are enjoined to make particular inquiries at their Annual Meetings in reference to all the points of Discipline specified in the first Article of the Answer to Q. XXVIII. in the *Minutes* of 1825.

The Private Donations in the Classes, on behalf of the Worn-out Ministers' and Ministers' Widows' Auxiliary Fund, shall be entered in the Class-Books at the next September Visitation, and collected in the month of October, and forwarded at once to the District Treasurer. (See *Minutes* of 1851, Q. xxvII., A. 2, Vol. XI., p. 664.)

2. The Private Subscriptions and Public Collections for the New Kingswood and Woodhouse Grove Schools, etc., are to be made in the early part of the month of November, 1875; and the amount, without any deduction on account of Educational Allowances to Children, is to be immediately remitted to the Rev. Frederick Payne, Rhyl, North Wales, one of the General Secretaries for the Schools' Fund. All sums due on account of daughters at the Schools must also be sent to Mr. Payne. Each Superintendent must also send to Mr. Payne a particular account of the sums contributed to the Fund, and of all claims for Educational Allowances in his Circuit, specifying distinctly the names of the children for whose education the claims are made, the *date*, *year*, and *place* of their birth, and the exact number of years during which the allowance has been received.

3. The Annual Subscriptions, due January 1st, and occasional Donations, for the Wesleyan Theological Institution, are to be solicited in every Circuit in the first or second week of January, 1876; and forthwith remitted to the Rev. John Farrar, Headingley, Leeds. Post-Office Orders are to be made payable in Leeds. The Public Collection for the Theological Institution is also to be remitted to the Rev. John Farrar.

4. The Public Collection on behalf of the Auxiliary Fund, to be made in accordance with the recommendation of the Conference, (see p. 688 of this Volume,) is to be remitted to the Rev. John Rattenbury, 3, Hamilton-Road, Highbury-Park, London, N.

5. Public Collections are to be made on the Sabbath in all the Chapels in each Circuit within the Metropolitan Postal Area on behalf of the Metropolitan Chapel Building Fund. These Collections, with those made at Public Meetings, and with Donations, Subscriptions, etc., are to be forwarded before the end of March, 1876, to the Rev. Gervase Smith, M.A., 13, Leigh-Road, Highbury-Park, N.

6. The Annual Public Collections for the General Chapel Fund are to be made, and Subscriptions solicited, in the month of February, 1876; and the whole amount should be immediately remitted to the Rev. Messrs. Edwards and Tindall, 'General Secretaries, Oldham-Street Chapel, Manchester.

7. The Yearly Collection in all the Classes is to be made, as usual, at the March Visitation; and the money is to be paid at the District Meetings in May.

8. The Private Subscriptions and Public Collections for the Wesleyan Education Fund are to be made in the month of April, 1876; and the money is to be paid, at or before the May District Meeting, to the Financial Secretaries, and by them remitted to the Rev. Theophilus Woolmer, 11, Wickham-Road, New Cross, London, S.E.

9. The Private Subscriptions for the Mission-Fund are to be received in all our Circuits, either weekly, monthly, quarterly, or annually, as is most convenient to the Subscribers. The annual Public Collections for that Fund are to be made in all our chapels, and other preaching-places, at the time of the Anniversaries of the several Auxiliary or Branch Societies; or, where no Public Meetings of that kind are held, in the month of May. The money so raised must be remitted, through the District Treasurers, to the General Treasurers, whose address is, Wesleyan Centenary Hall, Bishopsgate-Street-Within, London, E.C.

10. The Private Subscriptions for the Auxiliary Worn-out Ministers' and Widows' Fund are to be solicited in the month of May, 1876; and a list of Subscriptions is to be sent to the Secretary, the Rev. Henry H. Chettle, Woodhouse Grove, Apperley Bridge, near Leeds, not later than the 30th of June. (See Minutes of 1851, Q. XXVIII., Vol. XI., p. 666.) The money is to be paid on or before the first day of the Conference to the Financial Secretary of the District, and by him to Messrs. Napier and Rattenbury, the Treasurers.

11. The Collections in aid of the Home-Mission and Contingent Fund, for the support and spread of the Gospel in Great Britain and Ireland, are to be made in all our chapels and preaching-places, not later than the second Sunday in July, 1876; but, wherever practicable, before the May District Meeting, and in connection with a Public Meeting, as recommended by the Conference. Subscriptions and Donations are to be paid to the Treasurers as early as possible.

THE ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE TO THE METHODIST SOCIETIES.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,

"GRACE, mercy, and peace, from God our Father, and Jesus Christ our Lord," be upon you.

By the good providence of God we have been permitted to assemble in our one hundred and thirty-second Conference, with manifest tokens of the Divine favour, and with many evidences that, still, "the best of all, God is with us." It has not been without subdued and solemn feelings that we have met and engaged in the transaction of our business; for some loved and honoured brethren have disappeared from our ranks since we last met; and voices that were accustomed to cheer, to guide, and to stimulate, have been hushed in death. "Our fathers, Where are they? the prophets, Do they live for ever?" But "the Lord reigneth;" and whilst He sitteth King upon the holy hill of Zion, He will guard the interests of His Church, provide her with a succession of faithful ministers, abundantly feed her worshippers with good things, and extend her borders, until the whole earth shall be subdued unto Him.

Assembled, as we are, to consult concerning the welfare of our branch of the Church of God, and how most efficiently to promote its interests, our first and deepest anxiety is, that as you have received the Lord Jesus you may walk in Him, "adorning the doctrine of God our Saviour in all things;" and that you and we together may diffuse through the world the knowledge of Christ and the power of His truth. The "times and the seasons" call upon us to be more than ever decided in our religious character; to be fruitful in good works, exemplary in the discharge of all social and relative duties, and careful to let our light shine before men.

Never were there so many voices summoning the people of God to unreserved consceration and to earnest service as now. During the year a wave of Divine power has passed over our land, bringing revival to many Churches, and spiritual life and gladness to many hearts; and, as the result, an unwonted activity has been aroused. "Many run to and fro," and spiritual knowledge is being "increased." Most of the Evangelical sections of the Christian Church have been partakers of this gracious visitation, and have profited thereby; we rejoice greatly in their successes, and thank God on their behalf. Our own Connexion has very blessedly realised the reviving power, and in numerous places we have been favoured with "times of refreshing from the presence of the Lord." The increase of the members in our Societies during the past year, making all deductions arising from deaths, removals, and backslidings, is six thousand four hundred and seventeen, with twenty-six thousand seven hundred and nineteen on trial. This is a larger addition than has been vouchsafed to us for several years. We boast not, but we acknowledge the good hand of God, and from the depths of our heart we say, "Not unto us, O Lord, not unto us, but unto Thy name give glory, for Thy merey, and for Thy truth's sake."

Yet though we "thank God, and take courage," we would not hide it from ourselves or you, that there is reason for much searching of heart, for renewed personal dedication to God, and for increased diligence in the work of the Church. Notwithstanding the spiritual triumphs of the year, we cannot but acknowledge with regret that, in proportion to the number of ministers employed, the agencies in active operation among us, and the varied means of grace which it is the privilege of our Societies and congregations to enjoy, our success has been small. The question may well be asked, How is this ! Is the Lord's arm shortened ? It should never be forgotten that the power of the Church is in its spirituality : if this be not maintained, it will lose that which constitutes its chief glory, and which forms the secret of its aggressive energy There is a possibility of secularising the Church instead of spiritualising the world; of seeking to cause the marks of distinction, which separate worldly men from Christians, to fade away, until all shall be cnabled to walk together, without any great disgust on the part of the world, or any great sacrifice on the part of the Church. In such a case the Church of God becomes, like Samson when shorn of his locks, the sport of the profane, and weak to oppose the foes of Emmanuel.

Our anxious desire, beloved, is that that branch of the Church of Christ to which we belong may fulfil her mission—to spread Scriptural holiness. For the accomplishment of this it is necessary that we maintain our spirituality; and that as pro-

fessors of religion, our piety be not only unfeigned, but deep, influential, and all-pervading. "Suffer," dear brethren, "the word of exhortation." If we would be "established in the faith," and successful in its dissemination, we must "exercise ourselves unto godliness." There must be much secret prayer : for this is like "the flame" which "went up toward heaven," when "the angel of the Lord ascended in the flame;" therein may our souls ascend to God out of the wilderness of this world. We must give ourselves to the devout and serious reading of the Holy Book: for the Scriptures "are able to make us wise unto salvation, through faith which is in Christ Jesus;" they are " profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness;" and by them the man of God may be made "perfect, throughly furnished unto all good works." We must cultivate also the spirit of an earnest and practical selfscrutiny; not being afraid to probe very frequently the depths of our inner being, and to "examine ourselves whether we be in the faith."

One of the great needs of the present times is a thoughtful, meditative piety. For the most part men now live in public; they spend their days in a crowd; they move constantly under the high pressure of business; and all this is unfavourable to the cultivation of the religious spirit. Hence the importance, as far as practicable, of setting apart seasons for spiritual retirement, of having moments in every day expressly consecrated to the interests of the soul. By thus acting we shall be prepared to go forth to duty and to trial, "strong in the Lord, and in the power of His might." Day by day waiting upon God in the secret place, we shall continually renew our spiritual strength; our life will become a psalm of praise to God, a protest against the ungodliness of the times, an exemplification of the power of religious principles, and such an embodiment of the Divine, as shall allure men to that which is in the highest sense "the good, the beautiful, the true."

In association with these private duties, there are enjoined in the Sacred Volume social exercises—the importance of which cannot be overrated—directly calculated to promote the growth and development of spirituality of mind and heart, and the cultivation of a healthy, vigorous, and consistent piety. We refer, more particularly, to Christian fellowship and Church communion. "Let us consider one another," says the Apostle, "to provoke unto love and to good works; not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another." "Teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs." From its earliest days Methodism has made prominent its provision for "the fellowship of the saints." Our fathers rejoiced in the possession of this privilege, and regarded it as a most precious

inheritance. Myriads now before the Throne have borne testimony to the signal value of this means of grace. We eannot but regard it as indicating, in many instances, a lowered tone of piety, a declension in the spiritual life, when there is manifested on the part of the members of our Community a disposition to slight the weekly Class-meeting. It has been a help to millions on the road to heaven; it will be a help to us if we. like our predecessors, "speak often one to another" concerning the things of God. Woeful will be that day to Methodism, and to the piety of its people, when this service, conscerated to spiritual testimony, and hallowed by so many blessed memories. shall have lost its attractiveness and its power. In the interests of an inward, vital Christianity, of a religion which, whilst it is intensely subjective, is also warm, social, genial, outgoing, it is important that we maintain our meetings for Christian fellowship, and that our people avail themselves of the advantages which those meetings convey.

Among the characteristics of our country upon which we are accustomed to dwell with gratitude and pleasure, this is prominent,-that it is a land of happy homes. The family institute has prospered in our midst. We desire that this prosperity should continue. In order to this, let us exhort you to cultivate family religion: this brings gladness to the heart and happiness to the house. Family religion fosters piety and propagates it; individual godliness can searcely thrive where there is domestic heathenism. Let the morning and the evening prayer, with songs of praise, daily arise from all your dwellings. Let your children be early brought to the baptismal font, and there, in the initial covenant-ordinance of our religion, be dedicated to the service of God. Let their subsequent training and discipline be in harmony with the baptismal vows under which it is your bounden duty to place both yourselves and them. Be not afraid to instruct your children in what has been ealled "dogmatie" truth; let them be well grounded in the doctrines of our holy religion. For this purpose familiarise them with our Connexional Catechisms: it is scarcely possible too highly to prize these helps in the religious education of our households. Because of the neglect of eareful systematic nurture in the truth, many young people grow up with unsettled religious principles, with vague and indefinite views even as to some of the eardinal doctrines of the Bible, and thus become the easy victims of error and vice. The serious, earnest. diserect, and loving training of your children for Christ will save you from many a domestic sorrow; it will bring sunshine into your dwelling; and, living in the faithful discharge of family duties, you shall abundantly realise that the Lord "blesseth the habitation of the just."

In the eultivation of a piety that shall be at once intelligent,

reverent, and light-bearing, we earnestly exhort you to a diligent attendance upon the public means of grace, both on the weekdays and the Sabbath. The Sabbath services of the sanctuary, especially, have such claims upon all men, that it might seem unnecessary to urge them on any; yet we fear that in many religious circles there is a growing habit of being content with attending the house of prayer once on the Lord's day, whilst the remaining portion of the day is spent in listlessness, or desultory reading, or in a social intercourse that is spiritually enervating. It must not be forgotten that whilst the primary idea of the Sabbath is that of rest, it is rest in association with worship. and both must be combined if we would fully honour the day of the Lord. The hungry soul will delight to range in the "green pastures" of the sanctuary; and the man whose heart is right with God will be ready to give expression to his feelings in the language of the Psalmist, "I was glad when they said unto me. Let us go into the house of the Lord."

Frequent attendance upon the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper is at once a sacred duty and a very blessed privilege. We fear that there are those in connection with us who slight this Divine institution, if they do not habitually neglect it. Such are deeply blameworthy. It is the Lord's command, "This do in remembrance of Me," and we are solemnly bound to render obedience. The table of the Lord has surrounding it neither mystic charms nor superstitious terrors, but is an emblem of love; a sign and seal of "an everlasting covenant, ordered in all things and sure." All are welcome there who truly love Christ, who sincerely desire to serve and obey Him ; all who take Him as the sole foundation of their hope, and are ready to commit their eternal interests to the merits of His sacrifice and intercession. This sacramental service is most emphatically one for penitents, and none such will "eat this bread and drink this cup of the Lord unworthily," if they "draw near with faith," but will do so "to their comfort." Because of the neglect of this Divinely-appointed sacramental ordinance-perpetually oblizatory and universally binding-""many are weak and sickly imong you, and many sleep."

Impressed with the necessity of being on our guard against the first approaches of evil, however apparently trivial, we would affectionately call attention to the importance of not allowing in our School-Rooms any entertainments which are calculated to be njurious to the spiritual interests of our people. We would emind you of the great Christian law, designed to regulate our vhole deportment and conduct, "Whatsoever ye do in word or leed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God and the Father by Him."

As watchmen upon the walls of Zion, we regard it as imperaive upon us to maintain a vigilant outlook, and to sound, when needful, the note of warning. We would do so now. The Church is encircled by foes. Some are attacking her by sapping and mining, others by open assault. In this age of intellectual activity and reading, we feel that it is our ministerial duty to caution our friends in general, and our young people in particular. against the false principles and the insidious influences which pervade much of the literature, and especially many of the periodical works, of the day; and which are the more dangerous. because often found in publications which have obtained considerable popularity, and are distinguished by great talent. The tendency of a large section of current literature is to create a spirit of indifference to the essential doctrines of revelation : and this, under the guise of candour and liberality, is doing incalculable mischief, by flattering human reason, feeding the vanity of the carnal mind, and increasing a dangerous and criminal conformity to the world.

Every age of the Church has furnished its own peculiar forms of attack against "the truth." The principles in which those opposing forms originate have been the same; the developments only have assumed a novel aspect. Hence both Sacerdotalism and Rationalism, which are now troubling the Church, are simply old errors called by new names, and dressed in modern garb. The practical result of the triumph of either in the Church would be to dethrone Christ, and to set up the human above the Divine in religion. We fear not the issue. As in the past, so in the future, "" the truth as it is in Jesus" shall triumph, and the promise which God has made to His Church shall continue to be verified ;--- "No weapon that is formed against thee shall prosper; and every tongue that shall rise against thee in judgment thou shalt condemn." But, nevertheless, we would guard you, dear brethren, against the specious theories that are in circulation. Doetrine is essential to the life of the Church; and she wins her triumphs as she maintains the truth. It is a solemn duty, steadfastly to hold, and earnestly to defend, in its fulness and harmony, "the faith which was once delivered unto the Let us bring all teaching and practice to the test of saints." the infallible standard-the Divine Word. "To the law and to the testimony; if they speak not according to this word, it is because there is no light in them."

Not only have assaults recently been directed against some of the most important doctrines of Christianity, but also against its institutions. Especially is an organized and persistent attack being made on the sanctity and claims of the Sabbath. We do not wonder at this. Whilst infidelity calls in question the teachings of the Sacred Book; whilst Rome places human festivals on a level with the Lord's own day; whilst a large class of Protestants defend the Sabbath on the low ground of ecclesiastical authority; whilst Mammon and pleasure seck to turn this 733

hallowed season to their own selfish purposes, —so long will the Sabbath be assailed. But we trust that Wesleyan-Methodists will ever be found in the fore-front of the battle on behalf of this primeval institution. Our first duty, unquestionably, is each for himself to "Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy." If this be done, there can be no doubt that the spectacle of a consistent and uniform Sabbath observance by our entire Community, will exert a powerful moral influence, and will give weight to any representations which, as citizens, we may feel it our duty to make to the Legislature in defence of this birthright of the human race.

But Wesleyan Methodism—in connection with other evangelical Churches-has not only been set for the defence of the truth, but also for its propagation, and for the extension of the cause of God in the world. We are called not only to oppose error. but sin. There is a crying evil abroad in the land, --intemperance. We entertain a deep sense of the terrible calamitiesmoral, social, and political-which this vice has inflicted, and is daily inflicting, on our population ; we mourn over the thousands which, year by year, it lays low. Most earnestly we call upon you to discountenance that which produces this wide-spread ruin, and which in this country, perhaps more than anything else, counteracts the Gospel, and is the bane of every effort to elevate and to evangelize the masses, —the drinking customs of the people. Let your example, in respect to these customs, be such as the youth of your families may safely follow, as well as a protest against that which has been justly characterized as our national vice.

In aggressive work there has been much to encourage and to stimulate during the past year. The reports of spiritual success from our Foreign Missions have been most cheering, whilst the income of the Missionary Society has been larger than was ever before realised. Our Home Missions have been sustained with vigour; and not only in the towns, but also in the villages, of our land, God has put the seal of His approval upon this department of our work, in making it instrumental in bringing souls to Himself. Additional accommodation has been provided, in the erection of new chapels, for nearly twenty-five thousand hearers. The Metropolitan Chapel Building Fund has done a great work; and in the million-peopled city, by the help of this Fund, several beautiful houses of prayer have been reared and dedicated to the worship of God, amid manifest tokens of the Divine presence, and with every prospect of success. It is thus that God has been leading us on. "We will rejoice in His salvation, and in the name of our God we will set up our

No department of labour in the Church can be more important, nor should any more fully enlist the prayerful interest and efforts of God's people, than that which includes the youth of the Church, the "lambs" of the flock. We have not been unmindful of the claims of these, and in this work God has not been unmindful of us. The totals of our Sunday-school operations give for the year five thousand eight hundred and ninety-three schools, one hundred and eleven thousand and three teachers. and seven hundred thousand two hundred and ten scholars. This shows, as compared with last year, an increase of one hundred and six schools. The Day-school returns are also encouraging. One of the most important features of our Educational Work during the year has been the inauguration of the Connexional Sunday-School Union. The great objects of this Union are to eonserve our unity in teaching and organization, to furnish a higher class of Sunday-school literature in harmony with our theological standards, to aid in the equipment of Schools, and to bind together the whole Sunday-school work in one common bond of brotherhood and effort. The auspiees under which this Union has been started augur well for its efficient action and beneficial results. Since the enactment of a national law which provides for the secular education of all the children of the country, Sunday-schools—as religious institutions—are more necessary than ever, and are called to fulfil even higher and more important functions than they have hitherto done. Our desire is that they should be brought into yet eloser relation to the Church, and be made still more successful in winning the young ones to Christ.

Reviewing the year, our hearts are filled with gratitude to God for having enabled us, throughout the entire Connexion, to "keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace." That there are no divisions among us, we ascribe to His grace, and render praise to His name. We cordially and thankfully recognise the toils of our Leaders, Local-preachers, Teachers, Tract-distributors, Visitors of the siek, and other workers in the Church. We are labourers together in the vineyard of our Great Master and We invite the active eo-operation of all our members. Lord. Every man has something to do for Christ. There should be no idlers in the Church of God. Holding office in the Church is not the only call to Christian activity,---it is not the only qualification, nor does it furnish the only opportunity to save souls. Each within his own sphere, and moving in his own circle, should seek to bring men "to the knowledge of the truth." We are all alike under obligation,-even the poorest and the feeblest among us, -aecording to the "talents" we possess. to extend the Saviour's kingdom; and not until our personal responsibility in regard to this is felt, and set forth in action, will the Church fully accomplish her mission in the world. Individual effort is the great need of the times, and the demand of the Church.

It affords us pleasure to report that the sittings of the Con-

ference have been marked in a very eminent degree by the spirit of brotherly love. Questions of the utmost gravity have been under consideration, but differences of judgment have not lessened mutual confidence nor disturbed our harmony. Whilst there has been manifested a cheerful readiness to adapt our institutions to the claims and needs of the day, there has been also oneness of determination to maintain unimpaired the great principles which have been handed down to us by our fathers, and which, in times past, have been so signally honoured by God.

As ministers of the Lord Jesus Christ, we, on this solemn occasion, renew our vows of fidelity to God and His cause. We are not unmindful of the necessity of personal holiness in order to extensive ministerial usefulness, and the deep anxiety of our souls is, that we may exemplify in our daily lives, and in our pastoral intercourse with you, the power of the truth which we preach; that thus we may be "ensamples to the flock." With regard to the great subject of our ministry, it is as it ever waswe have nothing new. The preaching of "Christ crucified " we believe to be the best method of meeting the characteristics of this spiritually-restless and strangely-distracted age; the only means of bringing lost sinners to God, and the most effectual way to build up the Church. We would, therefore, in every sermon lift up the cross; and we would do this after the manner of our fathers. Our wish is to emulate the simplicity, fidelity, and zeal of the early Methodist preachers; and that, not to extend a sect, but to promote the glory of Christ in the salvation of men. But "who is sufficient for these things ?" Never let us forget that all success depends upon God; and that we can obtain that success only as we are "instant in prayer," and deeply experienced in Divine and heavenly things. It is a truth which we cannot too frequently impress upon our own hearts. and upon yours, that the recovery of souls, and the edification of saints, are the glorious work of the "Eternal Spirit" alone. We ask you, then, to join us in more earnestly and perseveringly supplicating the effusion of His influence upon our congregations, our country, and the world, that "the Word of the Lord may have free course, and be glorified."

Once more we go forth to our several spheres of labour. When the Conference shall again assemble, some who have taken part in its present deliberations will have been called to give in their account. Many of you to whom we now address ourselves will have "crossed the flood." Let us live as under the shadow of the great white Throne. It is our happy privilege to habitually realise acceptance with God through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ, and to enjoy constant fellowship with the Father and with His Son, through the indwelling of the Holy Ghost. See that this experience be yours. "Let your loins be girded about, and your lights burning; and ye yourselves like unto men that wait for their lord, when he will return from the wedding; that when he cometh and knocketh, they may open unto him immediately. Blessed are those servants, whom the Lord when He cometh shall find watching."

THE ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE IRISH CONFERENCE, 1875, TO THE BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1875.

VERY DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

Assembled once again in our Annual Conference, one of our most pleasing duties is that of greeting you in these customary words of respectful regard and esteem, and of thus cordially and gratefully reciprocating the truly fraternal and affectionate sentiments contained in your reply to our last Address.

Our Conference, whether having regard to the hopefulness of its tone, or to the members attending, and the influence resting upon its public services, has proved one to be remembered.

No act of your late Conference gave more satisfaction to us than the election to the Chair of that assembly of the Rev. Dr. Punshon; and nowhere were the tidings of that well-deserved honour received with more pleasure than in the several Societies of Irish Methodism. High as our hopes were, in anticipation of his visit as our President, it is only just to him to say, that, whether as conducting the business of the Conference, or ministering the Word of Life, our expectations were fully realised, and that we most cordially join with you in glorifying the grace of God in him.

You, who so well know his commanding abilities, will easily understand the disappointment felt by us in the necessary absence from our Conference of the Rev. G. T. Perks, M.A., our respected Ex-President; but very thankful have we felt all through our sittings that, when a substitute had to be provided, his place was filled by the Secretary of your Conference, the Rev Gervase Smith. M.A., whose public ministrations were highly appreciated, and whose brotherly spirit and generous sympathy have made him greatly beloved by us all.

Our thanks are further due to you for the appointment, as one of your Representatives, of our well-tried friend, the Rev. J. II. James, D.D., who is now well acquainted with our affairs, and continues to manifest a kindly interest in them.

continues to manifest a kindly interest in them. The Rev. John Walton, M.A., whom we had previously known as an able and successful advocate of the Mission cause, we were glad to welcome in this new capacity, and hope it is not the last time we shall see him on the platform of the Irish Conference.

time we shall see him on the plantorm of the claims of the British The Rev. William Arthur, M.A., —let the claims of the British Connexion call him where they may, —we venture to look upon as one of ourselves. We had expected to see him among us also, though not officially; and the disappointment occasioned by his absence has been widely expressed. We earnestly pray for the complete restoration of his health, and that a life so truly valuable may be long spared to our common Methodism, and to the Christianity of the world.

From the honoured brethren who represented you, as well as from your Reply to our last Address, we have learned, with grateful and devout satisfaction, your continued and growing prosperity in all the departments of your manifold work, and we rejoice with you in the obvious tokens of the Divine presence and approval. The success of the efforts which have resulted in the opening of the High School at Cambridge, has given us much pleasure; while, with a corresponding interest, we have looked upon your no less noble efforts for the prevention of crime, in the vigorous operations of the "Children's Home." Working thus at both ends of the social scale, we doubt not that Methodism will prove itself equally adapted to each; and, side by side with other Churches, will take a fuller share than ever in the predicted increase of knowledge and the promotion of the nation's weal.

In the setting apart by you of a minister to promote the objects of the Fund for the extension of Methodist agency, and in your spirited action connected with the launching of the Connexional Sunday-School Union, we see evidence of a vigour and enterprise which have not only excited our admiration, but which also afford us a pledge that, by the Divine blessing, the schemes referred to will have a successful issue.

Considering the relation of Irish Methodism, from the first, to the evangelisation of distant lands, you will understand how cordially we rejoice in the present flourishing condition of the Wesleyan Missionary Society; and we beg you to accept our assurance that, let the difficulties of meeting our Home claims be what they may, our people will still be ready to take their due share with you in an enterprise so manifestly owned of God, and which, admittedly, is the special glory of Methodism among the Churches.

We are deeply sensible of the great loss which not only the Mission cause, but Methodism itself, in all its interests, has sustained in the sudden and lamented death of the Rev. L. H. Wiseman, M.A. His visits to our Conference afforded us such opportunities of appreciating his ability as a preacher, and his administrative power, that while, with yourselves, we bow submissively to the mysterious Providence which has bereaved the Church of such a man, at such a time as the present, we deeply regret that we shall see his noble form among us no more.

The protests which you utter, from time to time, against the Ritualism and Sacerdotalism which, in your country especially, are working such serious mischief to Protestant Christianity, are nowhere received with more hearty approval than in the Irish Conference. That the present wave of religious revival has reached so many of your great centres of population has gladdened us very much; while, in the greatly increased attention which the members of other Churches around you are giving to the privilege of a full salvation, we gratefully recognise an emphatic testimony in favour of that old doctrine of Scriptural Holiness, which has been so prominently identified with the preaching of our beloved Methodism from the first.

Our present Assembly is the largest Wesleyan Conference which has ever met in Ireland; and the spirit of it, as regards the future of Methodism in this country, is more hopeful than at any former period of our history as a Church. Various causes, material and spiritual alike, have contributed to this. In some of our former Addresses to your Conference, mention was gratefully made of the general efforts of our Societies to improve the pecuniary circumstances of their ministers. It will gratify you to know that, in order in some sort to keep pace with the requirements of the times, there is now apparent a further movement in the same direction; so that, in very many of our Circuits, the Ministerial income for the coming year will show an advance of fully fifty per cent. over that of a few years ago. As you so often sympathized with us in the time of our difficulties, so, we are persuaded, you will rejoice in this further proof of the affection and liberality of our people. But we are sure you will specially rejoice with us in the fact that, to many of our Circuits, the past year has proved one of great spiritual blessing. The Spirit of God has been poured out in rich abundance, and the result has been the quickening of our existing Societies and the ingathering of a goodly number of precious souls to the fold of Christ; enabling us, after filling up all losses occasioned by emigrations, deaths, and other causes, to report a small, but still encouraging, increase in our present membership, with a considerable number on trial. To us, who have had so often to mourn over deercasing numbers, this is a subject of special thanksgiving and a ground of hope.

Our joy on this account is all the greater, that in this blessedly reviving influence other Churches have largely shared; nor can we look upon it as merely a coincidence,—or, indeed, as anything else than (dod's own rebuke to that spirit of scepticism which is abroad,—that such a movement should immediately follow the deliverance, under high sanctions, in the midst of us, of sentiments directly at variance with revealed truth.

Moreover, while deeply convinced of the truth that a revived Church will prove the most crushing rebuke of all to this scenticism. we are as fully persuaded as ever of the need of Methodism for the promotion of such a Revival, whether as fulfilling that part of her mission which consists in the quickening of other Churches. as protesting against the parasitic Antinomianism so often found in connection with such movements, or in respect to those azzressive efforts on the masses of the population in which, from the first, she has taken so prominent a part. Of her adaptation, as an evangelising agency, to the circumstances of this country in particular, we were never more fully satisfied than now : and we are determined that nothing shall be wanting on our part, which, by the help of the Most High, may tend to increase her efficiency, and to make her a greater blessing to this land than ever she has proved before. "Ireland for Christ !" is one of the watchwords to which the revived condition of the Churches in this country has lately given birth; and, notwithstanding that a dominant Popery, as a mountain-obstacle, still rises up before us.-to sav nothing of other hindrances which we meet in common with yourselves, -at no former period did our condition and circumstances as a Church more fully warrant us in adopting as our motto, in entering upon another year's toil, "Ireland for Christ!"

Our Death-roll for the year, while happily indicating no breach in the ranks of our active ministry, contains the names of two of our brethren who are specially held in remembrance by us;-the venerable John Hill, formerly known as "the Apostle of the Ards," from one of the localities in which he laboured, and in which he was enabled to accomplish a truly apostolic work; and the Rev. Thomas Ballard, brought to God through the instrumentality of the street-preaching of Ouseley, nearly seventy years ago, and who largely inherited the spirit of Christian bravery and zeal which so distinguished his father in the Gospel.

Five young men, who had creditably filled their period of probation, were set apart to the full work of the ministry, in a service, which, for gracious Divine influence and power, was never surpassed on any similar occasion among us, and the spirit of which, we pray, may long remain with us. Nine other young brethren, recommended by their respective District Meetings as candidates for our ministry, were accepted, five of whom were sent for training to the theological department of the College at Belfast, the value of which to our rising ministry is being increasingly felt and appreciated.

Both our Educational Institutions continue to prosper. The Belfast College has suffered much less than might have been expected from interruptions occasioned by a prevailing epidemic during the year; while the Connexional School in Dublin has had

a year of unprecedented success, notwithstanding the drawback in the fact that the contemplated erection of the new and enlarged premises is still deferred for want of sufficient funds. For both these Institutions we feel ourselves fully warranted in anticipating a future of still greater usefulness and prosperity.

You will be glad to learn that the scheme on behalf of our Auxiliary Fund, so successfully inaugurated at our last Conference, has met with considerable acceptance on the part of our people, and promises speedily to realise a sum which will enable us to place the Fund on a sound financial basis, and so relieve the anxieties of many on this subject. Nor shall we lose sight of the suggestion, in your Reply to our last Address, as to the duty of continued liberality in this direction. Indeed we have some reason to hope that the ventilation of the subject in connection with this special Endowment Fund will result in an increased annual income as well.

At our present Conference, while the routine business has been no less thoroughly gone into than usual, several special questions of more than ordinary importance have had our patient and anxious consideration. Foremost among these is the subject of Lay Representation in the Conference. That the consideration, for years past, of so important a change has been conducted in the entire absence of strife among our people is, with us, a matter of thankful acknowledgment, and confirms us in the belief that increased confidence reposed in them will not be abused. Here let us express our thanks to you for the opportunity afforded us of bringing this entire subject before a large and influential Committee of your Conference during the year, and for the consideration given to the scheme, as then submitted, by a Committee of this Conference. In this we see a further appreciation, on your part, of our difficulties, and an evidence of your desire that no distinctive action, which circumstances may demand on the part of the Irish Conference, shall be allowed to interfere with our Connexional unity. The Report presented to us by our Committee has been very carefully considered, and we have given a conditional approval of the scheme embodied in that Report.

We cannot yet report the consummation of the proposed union between the Primitive Wesleyan Connexion and our own. But if the negotiations proceed more slowly than some may desire, we have reason to hope that, when effected, it will, in the very thoroughness of these preparatory inquiries, prove all the more cordial and complete.

For fuller information on all these subjects, and on such others connected with our affairs, as you may desire to inquire into, we refer you, with all confidence, to our beloved brethren whom we now depute to visit your approaching Conference as our Representatives : viz., the Rev. Gibson M'Millen, whom we nominate for the office of Delegate ; and, as his companions in the Representation of this Conference, the Rev. William Crook, D.D., and the Rev. Thomas A. M'Kee. We have also deputed the Revs. Wallace M'Mullen and Joseph W. M'Kay to visit your Conference in connection with our proposed regulations on Lay Representation.

And now, beloved Fathers and Brethren, approaching the close of this cordial and happy Conference, we desire to commend you, and the glorious work in which you are engaged, to God. We pray that the great Head of the Church may preside over all your deliberations, and that He may be pleased to make all your conclusions eminently promotive of our Zion's good, and of His own glory. May the coming year be to our Connexion, on both sides of the Channel, one of unprecedented spiritual power and prosperity! With a view to this we desire to consecrate ourselves afresh to God, and, more fully than ever, to devote ourselves to the service of His Church. And we are persuaded you will heartily join with us in saying, as we together go forth in the labours of the year, to do battle with Satan and sin,—

> "Train up Thy hardy soldiers, Lord, In all their Captain's steps to tread ! Or send them to proclaim Thy Word, Thy Gospel through the world to spread, Freely as they receive to give, And preach the death by which we live !"

THE ANSWER OF THE BRITISH CONFERENCE, 1875, TO THE ADDRESS OF THE IRISH CONFERENCE OF 1875.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,

YOUR welcome and encouraging Address has been received by us with much thankfulness. It was heard by the Conference, and a large assembly of our people, with great interest; and all our hearts were gladdened to have it confirmed by your Representatives and our honoured President and Ex-President.

We rejoice to learn that, in common with ourselves and many other Churches, you have been permitted to share in the "showers of blessing" which have been so graciously vouchsafed to these Islands by the great Head of the Church during the past year; and that, as a result, you are enabled to report an increase in the number of your members. After so many trials of your faith and patience, we feel assured that this must be to you all a matter of unfeigned thankfulness to Almighty God; and we trust that it may inspire you with a lively hope that He will continue His favour unto you, and make you speedily as many more as you are.

While for several years you have had to report a decrease in numbers, you have been sustained by the assurance that you were not labouring in vain. Your losses by emigration have been gains to other lands; from not a few of which—America in particular—you have often received acknowledgments of the spiritual benefits thus indirectly reaped through your labours.

But, beyond all this, your faithful witness to the truth has been a "light shining in a dark place," the beneficial results of which, even upon Romanists, will never be fully known until that day when the secrets of all hearts shall be disclosed. We pray God that He may enable you to continue your faithful witness-bearing against that "mountain-obstacle" of a "dominant Popery," of which you complain; and that in Ireland, which you claim "for Christ," He may hasten the day when another mountain, "the mountain of the Lord's house, shall be established in the top of the mountains, and shall be exalted above the hills; and all nations shall flow unto it."

It is a matter of devout thankfulness, that the fruit of the Spirit has been manifested in the liberality of your people, who have willingly offered of their substance to the support of God's cause, and particularly in respect of His aged and afflicted servants, the Supernumeraries and Ministers' Widows. We trust that your hope for the future of your Auxiliary Fund may be abundantly fulfilled.

We congratulate you upon the continued prosperity of your Educational Institutions, notwithstanding temporary "interruptions" and "drawbacks." It is our growing conviction that, if your adopted watchword, "Ireland for Christ !" is ever to become an accomplished fact, it must be mainly through the Scriptural education and godly training of your Irish youth. For your own offspring you have the unexhausted promise made to Abraham :--- "I will establish My covenant between Me and thee, and thy seed after thee in their generations, for an everlasting covenant, to be a God unto thee, and to thy seed after thee." And for others, you have the inspired declaration uttered by St. Peter on the day of Pentecost :--- "For the promise is unto you, and to your children, and to all that are afar off, even to as many as the Lord our God shall call." Let these words of God encourage you to a yet more vigorous prosecution of this branch of your work; and lead you to be satisfied with nothing less, in all your plans and efforts, than the early conversion of your children.

You will be glad to hear that our own efforts to promote the

religious and secular instruction of the young, have been attended with much success; and that the changes produced by the legislation of recent years have turned out rather to our advantage. The establishment of School-Boards in the midst of our crowded populations has, in many instances, served to increase the numbers of scholars, to improve their attendance, and to secure for us children whom we should not otherwise have been able to reach.

You will also be glad to hear that we are able to report a continuance of that prosperity which has marked the history and management of our Chapel Affairs for several years past. In many instances, long-standing debts have been completely liquidated or greatly reduced; new and commodious, and in some cases beautiful, houses of prayer have been erected; and in others, old sanctuaries have been enlarged and improved, to meet the growing necessities of the work of the Lord.

Our Home-Mission Work steadily advances, notwithstanding many impediments; and our Foreign Missionary Income has this year far exceeded the returns of any previous year.

Above all, the Lord has given us of His Spirit; so that His word has mightily prevailed: multitudes of sinners have been converted, and the result is that, when we have filled up the loss of thousands, occasioned by removals, backslidings, and death, we have still, through the mercy of God, a net increase of six thousand four hundred and seventeen souls, with twenty-six thousand seven hundred and nineteen members on trial.

In the midst of the "Ritualism and Sacerdotalism" which, in this country, "are working such serious mischief to Protestant Christianity," we are fully persuaded of the fact that Methodism, and its testimony for the "one God and the one Mediator," are as much needed as they were amidst the Deism and worldly indifference of the last century. And while we will not suffer ourselves to be drawn aside from our great work of preaching the Gospel, to indulge in controversy, we are resolved more zealously to proclaim "those leading and vital doctrines of the Gospel which peculiarly distinguished the original Methodist preachers, whose labours were so signally blessed; and to apply them closely, affectionately, and energetically, to the consciences of the different classes of our hearers."

But besides the superstition of the Pharisees, we have also to contend with the Rationalism of the Sadducees, who labour to destroy the foundation-principles of our "most holy faith." We, therefore, dear brethren, feel ourselves specially called upon to avow our unwavering trust in that "full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction, for the sins of the whole world," which Christ by His death made upon the cross, and the denial of which undermines the whole fabric of spiritual truth. We congratulate you on the fact that no breach has been made in the ranks of your active Ministry by death; and that He who has called home to Himself, from your midst, two of His aged servants, has raised up so many young pastors for His people after His own heart.

Our present Conference has been a most united and happy one: our public religious services have been attended by great multitudes of devout and earnest worshippers; the Word of the Lord has been preached with power; and the Divine presence and blessing have been sensibly realised.

We have also been greatly encouraged by the large attendance of representative laymen at the preparatory Committees of the Conference; by the unwavering attachment they have shown towards our time-honoured institutions; and by the deep anxiety they have expressed for the spiritual prosperity of Methodism, and for the spread of Scriptural holiness throughout the land and the world.

We have appointed the Rev. W Morley Punshon, LL.D., the Ex-President, the Rev. John Rattenbury, the Rev. Dr. James, and the Rev. John W Greeves, to accompany our honoured and beloved President, the Rev. Gervase Smith, M.A., on his visit to your next Conference.

In conclusion, with deep and growing interest in your work, and with sincere and brotherly affection, we commend you and the people of your charge to the love and protection of the great Head of the Church; with the prayer that He may make His glory to appear amongst you, as in the ancient days, in the generations of old, and that, by His fostering blessing, you may see your children's children, and peace upon Israel.

ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH IN FRANCE AND SWITZERLAND, 1875, TO THE BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1875.

REV. AND DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

OUR twenty-second Conference was held this year at Dieulefit, in Dauphiny, in circumstances which form a striking contrast with our position seventeen years since, when we assembled in this town before. On that occasion, an official interdiction, obtained by unfair representations, closed all our places of worship in the Department in which our deliberations were to take place; and although they were speedily re-opened, after an interview with the superior Magistrate, we nevertheless passed through a time of great agitation and perplexity. This year we have met in perfect liberty and peace.

year we have met in perfect inderly and perfects of the Lord's We are thankful also to witness the progress of the Lord's work, in this part of His field, between these two periods. Seventeen years ago, in all the Drôme, we had no chapel our own property; at present we possess four, besides a good residence for a minister. We also record with pleasure the fact, that we have in all the principal places in these three Circuits good and steady congregations, with numerous, intelligent, and attached members.

In another respect, likewise, our Conference assembled at a very auspicious period. The signs of the times are full of promise for the Continent. We refer to the movement in the Evangelical Churches generally, in favour of Christian holiness. We believe that never within the last half century was there so extensive and hopeful a revival in France and Switzerland. This gracious awakening has spread to all the principal Protestant centres in both these countries. With joy it has been hailed, and with energy seconded, by prominent servants of Christ of all denominations. It has given a fresh life to Evangelical preaching, and to Christian agencies in general.

It would have been very strange, if we, as Methodists, and believers in the doctrine of entire sanctification, had not heartily joined in this blessed work. Our co-operation has been both sought and given readily. Our chapels have been opened for a series of services for the promotion of holiness, at which ministers and Christians of other Churches, forgetting all minor differences, united with our colleagues and friends in earnest efforts for the general good. Our ministers and members have been brought under the powerfully quickening and sanctifying influences of the Holy Spirit. The result has been that, in several localities, we have been blessed with revivals, and that many sinners have been converted to God. In consequence, the District Reports this year wear a more favourable aspect than for some years past. The cause is rising in many places where it had declined; members previously disheartened and enfeebled have regained new hope and courage, and, in the stations visited with these "showers of blessing," freshness has been restored to the class-meeting, causing this means of grace to be resorted to with pleasure.

We rejoice to be able to report progress in nearly all points of our general statistics. Our members and candidates together amount to two thousand and fifty, while we have an increase of fifty-one members. We number two thousand nine hundred Sunday-scholars, and ten thousand hearers. Several of our Schools prosper. We notice especially the girls' boarding-school at Nimes, and some of our Day-schools in Paris, and among the scattered Protestauts of the country bordering on Alsace-Lorraine. We most deeply regret our inability, for want of funds, to provide the means of education for many promising children of our people, convinced as we are that they might become useful school teachers, and some of the young men probably be called to the Ministry. Two pious young men, of Methodist extraction, have this year been accepted as students for our Institution.

We observe with some satisfaction that, in connection with the spiritual progress which we have witnessed this year, there has been a general increase in Circuit income; and indeed, we have had a steady, though slow, improvement in our local receipts for some years past. Besides this, we must not fail to mention extraordinary and generous efforts, on the part of our people, for special objects, and especially towards the extinction of chapel debts.

After this general review of the spiritual state and prospects of the work entrusted to our care, we are aware, honoured Fathers and Brethren, that you will expect from us a statement of the real condition of our Churches in point of organization. We have maintained the institution of the class-meeting, but we must confess our ecclesiastical weakness in this respect; and amongst the causes of this deficiency we acknowledge, first of all, our own shortcomings, and deeply mourn over them. At the same time we must express our conviction that, in regard to this falling off, we suffer in common with Methodism generally The comparative indifference towards the elass-meeting, which has been uoticed, in many cases, in England and America, has affected us also, and all the more deeply on account of our numerical feebleness. With us, as with other Methodist Churches, aversion to fellowship-meetings, in which speaking is obligatory on the part of attendants, has grown in proportion to the deeline of experimental religion.

Besides, we cannot hold back the truthful statement that the present disorganization of some of our Societies, in this special respect, is partly due to the general disorder into which the nation has been thrown in recent years. We continue to suffer from the fearful effects of the war, and from the most lamentable and exciting political events which followed that calamity. We also lament that, in these distressing circumstances, some of our influential members, instead of fully recognising the call to deep humiliation before God, were earried away by an excess of zeal for politics, which has proved sadly detrimental to their Christian fervency of spirit, and to their Church activity

Nor must we omit referring again to the efforts of other Churches to throw discredit on class-meetings, and to the easier conditions of membership required by those bodies, especially on the Sabbath question. This gives them a clear advantage over us, as to numerical progress; and it is the cause of many of our converts being attracted to their side, or at least of their remaining in a neutral position, in which they refuse to belong to any Church whatever. This form of individualism is one of the dangerous modern errors which we have to combat, and which is specially injurious to the organization of Methodism. It is evident, therefore, that in our mode of putting into practice the communion of saints, we have to withstand numerous and hostile influences, which nothing but a continuous state of revival could completely have counteracted. We humble ourselves for the littleness of our faith, which is doubtless the cause that we have failed to realise that great and abiding prosperity.

It is true that the present general thirst for holiness, and the cheering public testimonies borne by eminent believers to Christ's ability to save from the pollution of sin, have practically removed prejudice against class-meetings from the minds of some of our fellow-Christians. This favourable change, however, is of too recent a date to have produced as yet any great change in the state of our Societies in this particular.

But we have not deferred till the present time to put forth serious and persevering efforts in order to restore our discipline to a more healthy condition, and we are happy to state that these endeavours have not been wholly unsuccessful. We resolve to continue these efforts, and we feel the responsibility of a time of revival to secure the important end we have in view.

While we have thus acknowledged the weakness of Methodism in France, regarded as a special institution, we must maintain that that same Methodism, αs such, has been, and is still, a confessed, a great, a beneficial Christian power on the other Churches of the land, and on the moral and spiritual state of the nation. For this invaluable result obtained, we must, with a deep sense of our unprofitableness, give hearty thanks to God.

We must further affirm and record the cordial attachment to Methodism of many in our flocks, and their lively gratitude for the benefits received through its instrumentality. This we are bound to do on the part of a good proportion of two classes of our friends—both those who love the class-meeting, and those who are adverse to it. And by the latter, although they will not join our Church, pecuniary support is not withheld; on the contrary, it is often liberally afforded.

We present our thanks to you, reverend Fathers and Brethren, for the appointment of a Deputation to visit our Circuits. We regard this as a proof of your deep interest in our work—the work of spreading Scriptural holiness throughout France and the Continent in general. We regret, however, that the visit was made at an unfavourable season of the year, and that it was so rapid. In consequence, various important localities could not be seen, and amongst them some in which we have our best Societies. We think that, in a more lengthened inspection, your respected Delegates would have been enabled to form a fuller estimate of the great difficulties against which we have to struggle.

We are happy to state that, at the religious services held during the Conference, we have often realised the influence of the Spirit of grace. These services have been very largely attended, and the character of our devotional exercises has been calculated to promote heartfelt religion.—that living faith which purifies the heart and brings forth the fruit of a holy life. The holding of the Conference has also led to an edifying manifestation of brotherly union between the pastors of the Established Reformed) Church and ourselves. The pulpits of our brethren have been freely placed at our disposal, and they have joined with us in our services. We also bear a grateful testimony to the kindness and liberality of our friends at Dieulefit. They have cheerfully borne the entire expense of the ministers' board and lodgings during the sittings of the Conference. This is the first instance of the kind in our history, and promises well for the future.

We have again appointed as our Representative to your Conference the Rev. James Hocart. We have also nominated the Rev. William Cornforth as our President for the ensuing year. We respectfully request you to confirm this election.

Receive, reverend and dear Fathers and Brethren, the expression of our deep gratitude, and the assurance of our carnest prayers that God, our Father, may be with you in your approaching Assembly, and more than ever crown your labours with abundant success.

THE ANSWER OF THE BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1875 TO THE ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE METHO-DIST CHURCH IN FRANCE AND SWITZERLAND, 1875.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,

We have received and read your Address with much pleasure, with feelings of thankfulness to God on your behalf, and with renewed sympathy and brotherly affection towards yourselves.

Your Representative, the Rev. James Hocart, whom we honour

for his own sake and for yours, has once again brought before us the trials, labours, and successes of the Methodist Church in France and Switzerland. In all that concerns you we take a deep and loving interest. We count your joys and sorrows our own. If you suffer, we suffer with you; if you be honoured, we rejoice with you.

The condition and prospects of the Church, as described in your Address, appear to us to be eminently cheering. Not that we forget the special difficulties of your position and work. You labour among populations that are not friendly to Protestant and Evangelical truth; you have to encounter superstition and infidelity in their most advanced forms; while your numbers are small, your agency scattered, and your efforts often painfully hindered by straitened means. We may again assure you that, in all these respects, we feel that you have a claim upon our sympathy and prayers.

But you are able, by the blessing of God, to report some increase in your numbers, and, what gladdens us yet more, to speak of quickened spiritual life, of that best kind of progress, "growth in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ." We rejoice with you in the movement throughout the Evangelical Churches generally in favour of Christian holiness, and are especially thankful that many of your ministers and people have been brought under the powerfully quickening and sanctifying influences of the Holy Spirit. This thing is surely of God. May it spread and widen until it embraces the whole body of professing Christians upon earth ! The Church, thus renewed in spiritual strength, would soon fill the world with her testimony; then would she "teach transgressors" His "ways," and sinners would be "converted" to God.

It is an additional joy to us to know that you share the blessings of spiritual revival with the other Evangelical Churches of the Continent. It will be for your good and for theirs, as well as for the greater glory of God, that you should, as far as possible, be one in spirit and in action; and we accept it as the pledge of yet further blessing that you have already been happily associated with the servants of Christ of other denominations in the conversion of sinners and in the promotion of Christian holiness. In our own country the cause of Christian unity has been greatly advanced of late by such co-operation. Men's hearts have been enlarged, Christian love has increased, and the general effect of Christian testimony has been strengthened. It is much to be desired that in the presence of the powerful influences that oppose vital Christianity in Europe, there should be a true and living oneness amongst the followers of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Your difficulties with regard to the class-meeting are, as you observe, such as you share with your brethren in England, in America, and elsewhere. We find that our class-meetings faithfully indicate our weakness and our strength. From them proceed our first notes both of revival and decline. Times of religious depression are generally reflected in the scanty attendance and languid spirit of the class-meeting; whilst the indifference of our people towards these means of grace for the most part passes away when "times of refreshing come from the presence of the Lord." Let us aim, dear brethren, at sustaining amongst ourselves and our people that "fellowship with the Father, and with His Son Jesus Christ," which makes it our joy to have "fellowship one with another."

We are not disposed, however, to make the number of your members the only test of your progress. We are well aware that the influence of Methodism in quickening the life of other Protestant Churches, and in conserving a sound evangelical theology, affords ground for thankfulness to Almighty God, and much encouragement for future labours.

We can readily believe that you have found serious obstacles to your work in your recent national troubles, and in the excitement and uncertainty, from time to time, prevailing in the sphere of politics. These things will doubtless tend to divert many from the sober paths of Christian living, and indispose others to give heed to the things spoken; but we trust that the overruling hand of the Lord may so be with you that the sorrows and anxieties of these recent years may yet prove to be a discipline for good to very many.

We notice with pleasure that the spiritual progress amongst your Societies has been accompanied by some financial improvement, and, more particularly, that special efforts have been made towards the extinction of chapel debts. We know that among your people are "not many rich;" but your patient endeavour to encourage them to sustain the institutions and ordinances of the Church has already borne fruit, and will, we may hope, be yet more successful in time to come.

We gladly accede to your request that our esteemed brother, the Rev. William Cornforth, be appointed your next President.

THE ANSWER OF THE BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1875, TO THE ADDRESS OF THE GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES, 1872.

REVEREND FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

THE Address of your last General Conference (1872) to our Conference was duly presented to us last year at Camborne, by the honoured brethren, Bishop Harris and Dr. M'Cauley, whom you had deputed as your Delegates.

The Address was as full of good news and good cheer as it was cordial and brotherly, and the Ministers by whom it was conveyed commended themselves to our acceptance and regard as godly, wise, and gifted brethren, not unworthy to be ranked as successors of the distinguished men who, as representing your Church, have in former years been welcomed among us.

Coming to an Assembly, of whom many had been personally familiar with such models of Episcopal character and deportment as have heretofore visited us on your behalf, Bishop Harris approved himself to us as a minister of the same spirit, while his address to the Conference was strikingly characterized by practical wisdom. Dr. M Cauley, also, did honour to the choice of your Conference, and, both by his deportment and his public address, left upon us a marked impression of his gravity in counsel and his deep earnestness of spirit.

We have also, at our present Conference, had the unexpected happiness of seeing among us, as voluntary visitors, two of your most distinguished representative Ministers,—Bishop Simpson, to us now an old friend, and Dr. Curry, whom it had not been our good fortune to see before as a visitor to our Church or our country. Both these brethren addressed us in open Conference, to our great satisfaction and pleasure.

Our periods of interchange, in this way, of fraternal greeting and mutual communication, are, of necessity, measured by the four years' spaces which separate the meetings of your General Conference. Three years, accordingly, have passed away since the date of the Address which your messengers conveyed to us at Camborne. At the time of your writing you were able to tell us of the marvellous enlargement which had been, and was still, taking place among your Churches, and in the almost boundless sphere of labour in the midst of which you carry on your evangelizing operations. We are aware that, since that period, your further annual increases have been very large, and that your lines have been going forth continually into the vast and goodly land of your nation's inheritance. In comparison of such dimensions as your Church has attained, our proportions appear to be very small. We, it is true, represent the Mother-Church; but yours is incomparably the largest among the Churches of the Methodist family. You stand conspicuous before the world-the most massive Protestant Church to be found in any nation, and the one which numbers the largest company of professed communicants. Holding such a position, your responsibility cannot but be correspondingly solemn and momentous. You are pleased in your Address to say that "the various divisions of the great Methodistic household look" to us "for a continued example of missionary zeal." But to you we must look, in many respects, for an example of the manner in which a great evangelizing Church is to do its work in the midst of a nation, not only in the way of aggressive and missionary extension, but of pastoral care and duty, among families in which the profession of Christianity may be said to have become hereditary, and of which the largest proportion own an hereditary allegiance to the Methodist Church. We ourselves find this problem, in some of its aspects, to be by no means easy of solution.

Amid the motives of custom and expediency, of decent sentiment and recognised propriety, which tend to create and foster the habit of outward Christian profession, ---combined with the form of godliness, more or less proper and complete, which is wont to accompany such a profession, —it is not easy even for Methodism to retain its original character and spirit, as "Christianity in earnest," as an organization created and sustained for the simple purpose of diffusing Scriptural holiness, as a community of believers separated from the world and animated by the true spirit of primitive and apostolic Christianity. If we, the Church of so much smaller a section of our nation, feel this to be true, how much more must its truth and weight be felt in a Church like yours, --- the largest and the most centrally-placed Church in your country, the Church into which the unattached, or less strictly attached, professors of Christianity, on different sides of your own borders, are naturally drawn! Your difficulties, perhaps we might almost say your temptations, must in this respect be great; and, with deep Christian solicitude and sympathy, shall we mark the wisdom by which, as we trust, you will be enabled, in a satisfactory manner and measure, to cope with and overcome them.

It has been given to our Connexion, doubtless, in the good Providence of God, to take a leading part, however unworthily, in the great modern work of Christian Missions. To this fact you refer at some length in your Address. As yet you have not been able, in this respect, to do so much as we. We are well aware, however, that the reason of this difference between you and us, as you yourselves modestly intimate, has been your "immense national domain and rapidly increasing population," calling upon you continually, and perhaps never more than at present, "for the most energetic efforts of evangelization" within the limits of your own territories. We recognise this as having been emphatically your Missionary vocation. We rejoice, at the same time, to note that now, and for some time past, your Missions have extended beyond your own national boundaries. Your work, indeed, in Germany and Scandinavia may be regarded as the natural, almost the necessary, outgrowth from your own national Methodism, as established among your German and Scandinavian immigrant population. But your work in Italy is of another class. Having ourselves occupied that attractive and important field in advance of you, we welcome you into the country as brethren and as fellow-helpers of our faith and hope, not doubting that arrangements can be made by which the evil may be avoided of rival Methodist Churches in the presence of the Papal Arch-Enemy; and having the greater confidence in this respect, because of the close and affectionate fraternity which has been maintained bctween our missionaries in Italy and your large-spirited Representative in that country.

We have, from the first, marked with interest your Missionary enterprises in the Eastern world; and we trust that your recent and very promising work in Japan will be greatly and increasingly blessed.

On the southern portion of your own continent you have a missionary field which is peculiarly your own; your geographical position, and your special opportunities, appear to give you as clear a missionary call to that field as our own Church has had to South Africa or to Ceylon. Methodism, we cannot doubt, is destined to be to South America an evangelizing power and agency analogous to that which it has, in the order of Divine Providence, proved itself to be for the northern portion of the continent.

Our own care is at this time greatly occupied with Home Missionary enterprises, both in our agricultural counties and among the dense populations of our manufacturing districts and our large towns. Though our progress is comparatively slow, and chequered by positive decline in some parts of the country, —where the population is diminishing, and it is hard for a purely voluntary Church to maintain its footing, —yet, on the whole, we are steadily advancing. Our new Missions, even in purely agricultural regions, are taking firm hold of a soil where heretofore Methodism has never been able to gain a footing, but where it is greatly needed.

The increase in our Societies during the past year has been greater than for several years preceding, and altogether our prospects, at the present moment, are very encouraging. Our great need, our earnest prayer, is, that the Spirit may be poured from on high upon our Societies, and, above all, on us who are called to be the Ministers of Christ.

We have, for some time, been engaged in the peaceful and deliberate consideration of the best mode of completing and consummating that intimate union of our ministers and laymen in the transaction of our Connexional business, which has, for more than one generation, been so happily distinctive of our English Methodism, but which, in respect of its form and organization, does not yet fully answer our desires or the needs of our Connexion.

During the past year we have completed the general plan of our Connexional Sunday-School Union organization, and have successfully initiated its operations. We have at the present time five thousand eight hundred and ninety-three Sunday-schools, one hundred and eleven thousand and three teachers and officers, and seven hundred thousand two hundred and ten Sunday-scholars. Some time must of course elapse before all these elements shall have been actually drawn within the net-work of our Union, but we have no doubt that before very long the Union will be coextensive with the Sunday-school agencies of our Connexion.

We may not bring this communication to a close without referring to the mournful loss which our Connexion has sustained during the year in the removal by death of the late beloved and honoured Luke H. Wiseman, who was our Representative to your Conference four years ago. In the very prime of his powers, and working almost up to the last moment, he was taken suddenly away from the midst of us. No man was ever more beloved among us than our brother Wiseman; no death ever more startled or afflicted our Churches. We can but bow to the Divine will, and look forward to the great meeting-place above.

We have chosen as our President at the present Conference our beloved and honoured brother, the Rev. Gervase Smith, M.A., who is well known to many of yourselves, not only as a Minister of the Word, but as a Christian brother and friend, having himself been a welcomed and an honoured visitor among your Churches when he attended the Wesleyan-Methodist Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada as the Representative of this Conference.

We have deputed to attend your approaching General Conference our beloved brethren, the Rev. William B. Pope, Theological Tutor of Didsbury College, and the Rev. James H. Rigg, D.D., Principal of the Westminster Training Institution, two of our most able and honoured ministers, whom we commend to your fraternal esteem and confidence.

And now, dear Brethren, "we commend you to God, and to the Word of His grace." We see—both you and we—what is our special calling, the calling common to the Methodist Churches, both in the old and the new world. Through Divine mercy, and according to the wonderful ordering of Providence, Methodism has been made the means of reviving evangelical life throughout the world. The name "Methodism" in every land has become a synonym for experimental godliness. The doctrines of conscious pardon and of holiness—of inward and outward holiness, a growing, penetrating, pervasive, victorious holiness, the power and

growth of which is to transform the whole inner man "from darkness to light," from the power of Satan unto God,-these doctrines were, a century since, supposed to be peculiar to Methodism; but now they are rapidly becoming the recognised doctrines of earnest Christianity everywhere. How important is it, under such circumstances, that the great Methodist Bodies should retain their integrity as to all that appertains to Christian orthodoxy and Christian life and experience ! May we have grace to be faithful, you on your side of the ocean, we on ours! Thus will Methodism continue to be a blessing to the whole world. The smaller Methodist organizations cannot but be largely influenced by your Church and ours; nor can all other Churches fail to be influenced profoundly by the Churches of the Methodist family. The world's health, and the progress of universal Christianity, depend very greatly on the life of Methodism.

Invoking upon you all the blessings of grace and pcace in Christ Jesus, our common Lord, we bid you farewell in His name.

ADDRESS OF THE GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA, TO THE BRITISH CONFERENCE, 1875.

Reverend and dear Fathers and Brethren,

It has given us much more than ordinary gratification to receive in this our First General Conference your fraternal Address, replete, as it is, not only with sentiments of warm affection, but with wise and appropriate counsels. We gladly accept it as an additional proof of your regard, that you have sent to us, as your Representative, the honoured Secretary of your Conference, the Rev. Gervase Smith, M.A., from whose addresses and Sabbath ministrations we have derived much pleasure and advantage.

After full and careful consideration we have agreed, by an almost unanimous vote, that the name of the united Church represented in this General Conference shall be "The Methodist Church of Canada ;" and it is our earnest desire to obliterate to the utmost all traces of former alienation or division in the great Methodist family of this Dominion. The Methodist Church of Canada will now cover a territory extending from the Atlantic

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to the Pacific : and, in addition to the Provinces of the Dominion. will include also the Islands of Newfoundland and the Bermudas. The number of ministers and preachers belonging to the Church is one thousand and nine; of Church-members, one hundred and two thousand two hundred and thirty-eight; and of adherents. nearly half a million. According to the tables of the last public census, the total number of Methodists in the Dominion is five hundred and sixty-seven thousand and ninety-one; in which estimate are included the adherents of the Primitive and Episcopal Methodist Churches. The number returned in the same tables as Presbyterians is five hundred and forty-four thousand nine hundred and ninety-eight; and as Episcopalians, or of the English Church, four hundred and ninety-four thousand and forty-nine. From which it will be seen that "the people called Methodists" considerably outnumber any other single Protestant denomination in the Dominion.

We are profoundly thankful to Almighty God for the growth of this form of earnest Christianity in British North America, and for the remarkable and rapid success which has attended our recent efforts after organic oneness; but we would lay solemnly to heart the salutary and well-timed injunctions of your Address, and remember that "all Church-organization is only a means to an end," and would still strive "to value more highly the substance of a Church's teaching than the form of a Church's organization." We have taken care to provide, as far as in us lies, for the preservation of the doctrinal teaching and religious discipline by which both English and American Methodism have hitherto been characterized; and we trust that our new organization, while not less favourable than the old to the spirit of religious revival, will be even better adapted to continued aggression upon all forms of error and sin.

We have chosen as the President of this our First General Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada, the Rev. Egerton Ryerson, D.D., LL.D., Chief Superintendent of Education for Ontario, the oldest minister of the Church now in the effective ranks, and one whose name has become a household word in this land, because of his eminent abilities as a writer, his untiring labour in the Christian Ministry, and his singular merits and reputation as the founder of our noble system of Public Instruction.

Our Conference proceedings have been marked by delightful harmony and good feeling. The union of representative laymen and ministers in this highest court of the Church has not, thus far, disappointed our cherished expectations; and we have been able to act with happy unanimity in completing such arrangements as seemed necessary to consolidate and advance the various interests of our entire Community. The attempt to unite, under one common supervision, numerous societies and institutions connected with different fields of labour, has of necessity called for much anxious thought and the exercise of mutual concession; but it is hoped that such adjustments have been effected as will give general satisfaction, and secure the unity and elasticity of our Connexional system in the best way practicable throughout so wide an extent of territory.

Our Missionary Societies, our Publishing Interests, our Superannuation and Contingent Funds, our Sunday-schools and Educational Institutions, have all passed under review, and have been brought, as far as possible, into harmony with our new organization. We have formed an Educational Society after the manner of our Missionary Society, with the view of bringing annually before our people the important subject of Christian education, and of increasing the resources of our Universities, Theological Schools, and other Seminaries of learning. We have also recommended the founding of a Missionary School, for the training of French Canadian youths in the Province of Quebec.

The signs of the times remind us more and more of the dangers of a culture that despises the authority of Revelation, and ignores the redeeming work of Him in whom lie hid "all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge." As the best antidote to infidelity on the one hand and superstition on the other, we are resolved, by the blessing of God, to establish and maintain in this young empire Christian colleges and schools for the higher education of youth of both sexes, and to demonstrate to the world the natural alliance of religious faith and intellectual freedom.

We thank you for your words of encouragement in regard to our recently undertaken Missions in the Empire of Japan. The accounts received thus far from the devoted brethren in charge of those Missions have confirmed the conviction with which the work was begun, and the increase in the contributions of our people for missionary purposes has shown the wisdom of devising liberal things, and that by liberal things we shall stand.

The more vigorous prosecution of our Missionary work will, we trust, be one of the immediate advantages arising from the unity of Canadian Methodism. We feel, dear Fathers and Brethren, deeply humbled before God, as a part of the Church universal, that after the lapse of eighteen hundred years the immense populations of Oriental lands should still remain in heathen darkness; that there should be found, even in young America, an ample supply of social comforts, and wealth and energy adequate to the most gigantic schemes of material development, and with all this an apparent lack of men, or means, or spiritual life, to convert the perishing millions of India, China, and Japan. We count it one of the highest aims of these friendly communications to stir each other up to a due sense of responsibility in this great matter, and we respectfully entreat you to join with us in earnest supplication to the great Head of the Church for thet spirit of Missionary zeal which glowed in the breasts of the Apostles, and for the hastening of the time when all nations shall be blessed with the fulness of the blessing of the Gospel of Christ.

The name of W Morley Punshon, dear to us for his distinguished services to the cause of Christ in Canada, ought, perhaps, to be the most of all dear to us, because of his courageous faith in quickening our efforts to establish the Mission in Japan. We rejoice to learn that you have elected him to the Presidency of the British Conference, and shall be glad, on some future day, once more to see his face and hear his voice in America.

We have been favoured in our Conference with the presence of the venerable Bishop Peck, of the Methodist Episeopal Church in the United States; of the Rev. Thomas B. Sargent, D.D., of the Methodist Church South, Representative to your Conference in 1842; the Rev. J. H. Robinson, Representative from the New Connexion Church of England, and the Rev. W H. Cornforth, of the British Conference. The presence of these distinguished visitors has added largely to the Methodistic sympathy and Christian profit of our Assembly.

We have chosen as our next Representatives to the British Conference the Rev. Dr. Ryerson, our beloved President, and the Rev. David Savage.

In conclusion, dear Fathers and Brethren, permit us again to assure you of our unchanged attachment to you as the Mother of all the Methodist Churches of the world, and of the deep interest with which we shall continue to look for your accustomed fraternal greetings, the visits of your Representatives, and your weighty words of parental counsel and exhortation.

And, "now unto Him that is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us, unto Him be glory in the Church by Christ Jcsus throughout all ages, world without end. Amen."

ADDRESS OF THE GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE AUSTRALASIAN WESLEYAN-METHODIST CHURCH, 1875, TO THE BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1875.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,

ABOUT forty ministers have assembled in this city of Melbourne, as Representatives from the Methodist Church in all the Australian Colonies and our Polynesian Missions, to constitute the first General Conference under the new arrangements sanctioned by the British Conference of 1873. Yet we have no disposition so to rejoice in the growing completeness of our self-government as to forget the bonds of sympathy which have so long united us to British Methodism, and the substantial benefits which we have many times received through your counsel and munificence. And while there has been manifested in this Conference a very strong desire to open the way for our laymen to occupy a more conspicuous place in our proceedings, and to exert a more direct influence on our legislation and government, yet those words of your Address of 1873 were received with emphatic approval, which counsel us to carry out the contemplated changes "with great unanimity and deliberateness," and to make them "rather the spontaneous outgrowth of circumstances than the anticipation of future and contingent requirements."

By an interesting coincidence the senior President of the Conference, whose duty it was to open the first session, was able to tell us, that though not the first Wesleyan minister who preached in Victoria, yet he was one of the first, having been appointed as a Wesleyan missionary here thirty-five years ago. Thus, within the few years of one ministerial history are gathered the planting, the robust growth, and the almost completed self-regulation of the Methodism which assembles now at its first Legislative Conference in this city-itself the product of social forces acting with great energy, and within a very brief period. During a time of so much occasional violence in its political contests, and of so much abruptness in the movements of the population in connection with the discovery of gold, it would have been no strange thing if our Methodism had been rudely shaken by these excitements, and had passed through a severe ordeal in maintaining the purity of its doctrine, the fidelity of its discipline, and the vigour of its spiritual life.

And though it would be too much to affirm that our Churches have not yielded, in some respects, to unsound popular opinions concerning Christian life, doctrine, and Church-government, yet we may emphatically assure you that no preaching finds such acceptance with our congregations as that which strikes the old Methodist tone in proclaiming the great truths of the Christian salvation; and that we desire as earnestly as yourselves to wit-

In the Minutes of our Conference will be found a request that you will appoint a Minister from yourselves as a Deputation to our next General Conference, to be held in Sydney three years As the first occasion in which very important changes hence. in our Constitution may be introduced, it would be obviously of great advantage to us to have in our midst such a counsellor as you would choose to represent you here. But our desire for such a visitor extends far beyond the expectation of aid in our deliberative assemblies. In our public services of every kind, the ministrations of one of the leaders of English Methodism would be received with most affectionate welcome. We are not satisfied to know these honoured men only through the press. We read their public addresses, and their literary productions, with deep interest; but we desire to hear their living voices. and in their actual presence to be more vividly reminded of sanetuaries and services removed from us by the whole breadth of our planet, but associated with our conversion to God, and the first steps of our eareer as workers in Christ's Church.

We forward for your consideration a plan of Lay-Representation in our Conferences on which we have bestowed much care; and we hope it will meet with your approval. We are anxious to bring it into operation with as little delay as possible.

The Rev. James Buller, President of the New Zealand Conference, and for many years occupying a prominent and influential position in relation both to the Maori and the European work in those Islands, and who expects to be present at the British Conference of 1876, has consented, at the unanimous request of this Conference, to be our Representative on that occasion. We commend him to your consideration as a Minister held in the very highest esteem by us, on the ground both of his personal character and his long service in our ranks.

To hear of your prosperity, and to receive your messages, will give us joy at all times.

ADDRESS OF NONCONFORMIST MINISTERS IN SHEF FIELD TO THE PRESIDENT AND MEMBERS OF THE WESLEYAN-METHODIST CONFERENCE ASSEMBLED IN SHEFFIELD, AUGUST, 1875.

DEAR BRETHREN,

WE, the ministers of the several Evangelical Nonconformist Churches of this town, desire to offer to you our most fraternal greeting, and the expression of our cordial Christian affection. Though separated from you by some points of difference, either in faith or Church-order, which we do not profess to think lightly of, we yet feel ourselves altogether one with you in the fundamental and essential principles of the oracles of God, and altogether one, therefore, in the great work which you and we are respectively called upon to do in the service of our common Master. We are glad and thankful that the time has come, when this substantial oneness is more distinctly seen and more deeply felt than it formerly was, and when, as the consequence of this, opportunities are more eagerly desired and sought for testifying this oneness to each other and to the world. Many things have no doubt contributed to this result, and among the rest may be mentioned the assault that has been made upon our common faith and worship, by Sacerdotalism on the one hand, and scientific Infidelity on the other. To which may surcly be added, as a further and much more gratifying reason, a growing conviction on the part of all of us, that the world is less interested in the matters that divide us than in those which unite us, and that its claims on our religious anxieties and labours are such as to domand that we merge, as far as possible, our subordinate distinctions in the genuine compassion we feel for sinners, and in the sympathy we cherish with the Lord Jesus in His Mission to seek and to save them. To strive together, not for any inferior interest, but "for the faith of the Gospel," -this is the one work to which we are chiefly and specially called; and never, perhaps, was the call, as interpreted and repeated alike by the needs of the Church and the moral condition of our countrymen, louder or more piercing than at present.

We congratulate you, dear Brethren, very heartily, on the protest you have publicly and officially made against the indignity offered to yourselves, and so to English Nonconformists generally, in the matter on which the Dean of Arches has just pronounced a formal judgment, confirming the previous judgment given by the Chancellor of the diocese of Lincoln. Pending the decision of a yet higher tribunal, to which we hope appeal will be made, we are unable to say whether that judgment is in harmony with the law of our country or not; but, if it be, we venture to affirm that the law itself is most offensive and unjust, stigmatizing, as it virtually does, the Nonconforming Churches of England as schismatical, by expressly denying the validity of their clerical orders. And we trust your efforts in regard to this matter, as also in regard to other similar controversies, involving the principles of Ecclesiastical freedom and religious equality, will not be intermitted or relaxed until what is wrong is made right, and what is true is put in place of what is false.

We are not unfamiliar with your history and traditions; and rejoice unfeignedly in the great achievements you have accomplished in almost every field of Christian enterprise whether at home or abroad. Your Missionary activity has not only been greatly honoured in respect to its immediate object, but has served for stimulus and encouragement to other Churches; while your large and generous liberality in support of your own institutions has presented, and does still present, a worthy example for other Churches to follow. We observe with thankfulness and joy the signs and proofs which your published statistics present of your continued enlargement and prosperity, both in actual membership and in resources and means for still further aggression and progress; and commending you, as we do, to the lovingkindness of Him with whom finally rests the success of all spiritual efforts, we devoutly say, in the words of one much greater and holier than we,-""The Lord God of your fathers make you a thousand times so many more as ye are, and bless you, as He hath promised you !"

MEETING OF THE MISSIONARY COMMITTEE OF REVIEW,

HELD IN SHEFFIELD, TUESDAY, JULY 27TH, 1875.

MOVED by the Rev. Dr. Jobson; seconded by Mr. S. D. Waddy, M.P.; supported by Sir F. Lycett:

1. That this Committee cannot proceed to the consideration of the business now before it, without some expression of its sense of the great loss which it has sustained in the removal by death of the Rev. Luke Hoult Wiseman, M.A., who, as one of the General Secretaries, rendered eminent service to the Society by his wise counsels, his arduous labours, and his eloquent addresses. The Committee feels admonished by this painful visitation to pray more earnestly for suitable Agents to carry on the work of God both at home and abroad.

Moved by the Rev. David Hay; seconded by Mr. Joshua Bryant, of Alford; supported by Mr. Isaac Jenks, of Wolverhampton: 2. That this Committee rejoices in the financial prosperity of the Society; and, believing that this is largely attributable to the steady and vigorous working of its long established organization, urges Committees, Treasurers, Sccretaries, and Collectors, to whom the Society is so much indebted, still to abound in their valuable and important services.

Moved by the Rev. H. J. Piggott, B.A.; seconded by Mr. T. Farmer Hall; supported by the Rev. Thomas A. M'Kee, of Dublin:

3. That the wide and disastrous prevalence of Romanism and Ritualism among the nations of Europe, renders it necessary, wherever practicable, that the Gospel testimony, as borne by the Agents of this Society, should be faithfully maintained; and this Committee rejoices, therefore, to know that efforts are being made to strengthen the Society's position in France, Germany, Italy, Portugal and Spain.

Moved by the Rev. John Kilner; seconded by Mr. William Mewburn, of Banbury; supported by Mr. Subrahmanyam:

4. That this Meeting recognises in the numerical increase of the Churches in the East, in the active operation of the High Schools in India and Ceylon, and in the rapid growth of Native Agency, abundant reasons for thankfulness to Almighty God, and renewed encouragement to earnest prayer to Him whose blessing alone can make the labours of His servants successful.

Moved by the Rev. Dr. Osborn; seconded by Mr. Elkanah Healey, of Liverpool; supported by Mr. Skelton Cole, of Sheffield:

5. That this Committee recommends that the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. Dr. Jobson and Mr. James S. Budgett, the General Treasurers; to the Rev. William B. Boyce and George T. Perks, M.A., the General Secretaries; to the Rev. William Arthur, M.A., Honorary Secretary; and to the Committee of Management, for their services to the Society during the past year.

I.—ANNUAL MEETING OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE NEW KINGSWOOD AND WOODHOUSE GROVE SCHOOLS AND EDUCATION FUND,

HELD IN SHEFFIELD, JULY 23RD, 1875.

PRESENT, the Rcv. W M. Punshon, LL.D., President of the Conference, in the Chair; the Rev. Gervase Smith, M.A., Secretary of the Conference; the Rev. Benjamin B. Waddy and Mr. John Meek, the Treasurers of the Fund; the Rev. Frederick Payne and the Rev. John Harvard, Secretaries of the Fund; the Rev. G. Stringer Rowe and the Rev. Henry J. Pope, Treasurer and Secretary of the Children's Fund, and others.

It was reported that the number of Ministers' children upon the Fund in the past year has been 697; in the Schools, 248 boys and 135 girls; receiving educational allowances at home, 314 boys and girls. The cost has been £17,545 2s. 7d.; and the deficiency provided for by the Children's Fund is £3,329 7s. This is £714 14s. 3d. less than the deficiency of last year.

All the Schools, with the exception of New Kingswood, have been tested by examinations, conducted under the auspices of the Syndicate of the University of Cambridge, with results satisfactory as to the past, and suggestive as to the future. At New Kingswood, owing to the new arrangements for next year, it was thought best not to have this Midsummer the usual examination *ab extra*.

It was unanimously resolved to recommend that the thanks of the Conference be given,—

1. To the Rev. Benjamin B. Waddy and Mr. John Meek, the General Treasurers; the Rev. Frederick Payne and the Rev John Harvard, the General Secretaries; and to the Local Treasurers, Secretaries, and Committees, for the diligent and efficient discharge of the duties of their respective offices during the year.

2. To the Rev. Henry H. Chettle and the Rev. John H. Lord, the Governors of the Schools; and to Mrs. Chettle and Mrs. Lord, together with the ladies having charge of the Schools for girls at Clapton and Southport, for their kind attention to the comfort of the children under their care during the past year.

3. To the gentlemen who, at the request of the Local Committees, have kindly served the Institutions by examining the Schools for both boys and girls in various branches of learning.

II.—SCHEME FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE KINGS-WOOD AND WOODHOUSE GROVE SCHOOL.

I.-THE GOVERNING BODY.

1. The School and School property shall be managed by a Committee (or Governing Body), to which shall be transferred

the powers as to the management of the Schools and School property now possessed by the existing Committees of the Kingswood and Woodhouse Grove Schools. This Committee may, under the direction of the Conference, procure incorporation, and if they do so the School property shall be vested in the body so incorporated. This Committee (or Governing Body) shall consist of Ministers and laymen.

- 2. The President, Ex-President, and Secretary of the Conference;
 - The General Treasurers, and the General Secretarics of the Schools' Fund;
 - The General Treasurers, and the General Secretary of the Children's Fund;
 - The Chairman, for the time being, of the Leeds, Halifax and Bradford, Bristol, and Bath Districts;
 - The Governors and Head Master of the School for the time being;

shall be ex-officio Mcmbers of the Committee.

There shall be twenty-four other Members, to be called elected Members.

3. The first elected Members of the Committee shall be appointed by the Conference of 1875, and shall hold office until the Conference of 1878.

4. The twenty-four elected Members shall retire from office at the times and in the proportions following :---

At the Conference of 1878, eight of the elected Members, to be determined by ballot among themselves, unless they shall otherwise agree, shall go out of office :---

At the Conference of 1879, eight of the remaining number of the elected Members, to be determined in like manner, shall go out of office :---

At the Conference of 1880, the remaining eight shall go out of office. In each instance the places of the retiring Members of the Committee shall be filled up by the Conference; and at every subsequent Conference one-third of the elected Members of the Committee, being those who have been longest in office, shall go out of office, and their places shall be supplied in like manner. No Member of the Committee retiring from office shall be eligible for immediate re-election except in special cases. The Members who are to retire in rotation shall hold office until replaced.

5. Of the Members thus elected by the Conference, one shall be nominated every three years by the Masters of the School, other than the Head Master.

6. One shall be nominated annually by the Associates of the School. All pupils of Kingswood, New Kingswood, or Woodhouse Grove School, who shall have left before the date of this Scheme, and all pupils of this School who shall hereafter receive

a certificate of honour or merit from this School, shall, if annual Subscribers to the funds of the School, be called Associates.

The mode of nomination under this and the preceding clause shall be fixed by the Committee. The Conference shall not be bound to accept a nominee under either of these two clauses.

7. Every Member of the Committee must be a Minister in full connexion, or a Member of the Wesleyan-Methodist Society. No Master of the School, other than the Head Master, shall be a Member of the Committee.

8. A Member of the Committee shall vacate his office :---

- (1.) By death;
- (2.) By voluntary retirement, to be signified by him to the Committee in writing:
- (3.) By resolution of the Conference removing him from office;
- (4.) By becoming lunatic or bankrupt, or by the liquidation of his affairs; or
- (5.) By neglecting, for one year, to attend any Meeting of the Committee, or any Sub-Committee thereof.

Vacancies under this clause shall not be filled up until the period when the Member vacating office would have retired in rotation.

9. The Committee may act, notwithstanding vacancics in their body.

10. Subject to any regulations which may be made by the Conference, the Committee may fix their own times and places of meeting, their mode of summoning Meetings and transacting business, their quorum and procedure. They may appoint Sub-Committees with such powers as they think fit. They shall keep minutes and accounts, and may appoint a Vice-Chairman, who shall act in the absence of the President of the Conference. They shall also appoint a Secretary and a Treasurer, and may appoint any other officers.

11. The Accounts of the School up to the end of June in each year shall be audited in the month of July in that year, by a Professional Auditor to be appointed by the General Committee of the Schools' Fund. No Member of the Governing Body shall be an Auditor. A copy of the Balance-Sheet so audited shall be immediately forwarded to the General Secretaries of the Schools' Fund.

II.-THE SCHOOL AND ITS MANAGEMENT.

12. The Governors and the Hcad Master shall be the chief officers of the School. The Governors shall be appointed and removed by the Conference on the recommendation of the Committee or otherwise. The Head Master shall be appointed by the Committee, and may be removed by the Conference after six months' notice, without assigning cause.

13. Each Governor shall be a Minister in full connexion with the Conference; and if suspended from his office as a Minister, shall thereby vacate the office of Governor. If a Governor die, or be suspended from his office as a Minister, or be incapacitated for the discharge of his duties in the interval between the sessions of the Conference, the Committee shall make due provision for the temporary discharge of the duties of Governor.

14. The Committee may dismiss the Head Master without assigning cause on six months' notice; but the resolution dismissing him must be passed at two consecutive meetings of the Committee, held at an interval of not more than four weeks, or less than two weeks. Within a month from the second meeting, the Head Master may lodge an appeal to the Conference with the President. The dismissal shall not take effect pending the appeal, but shall take effect immediately on the confirmation by the Conference of the dismissal, if the six months have elapsed.

15. Neverthelcss, for urgent cause, the Committee may, by resolution passed at a Special Meeting duly convened for that express purpose, and affirmed by not less than two-thirds of the whole existing Committee, suspend the Head Master from his office, and make temporary provision for the discharge of his duties. Full notice and opportunity of defence, both against such dismissal and against such suspension, shall be given to the Head Master.

16. Every Head Master, previously to entering into office, shall be required to sign a declaration in the Minute Book of the Committee, in the following form :---

"I, declare that I will always, to the best of my ability, discharge the duties of Head Master of the Kingswood and Woodhouse Grove School during my tenure of the office, and that if I am removed by the Conference, or the Committee, according to the constitution of the said School, I will acquiesce in such removal, and will thereupon relinquish all claim to the Mastership and its emoluments, and will deliver up to the Committee, or as they direct, possession of all their property then in my possession or occupation."

17 The Governors and Head Master shall reside in the dwelling-houses assigned for their respective residence. Each shall have the occupation and use of such house and any other property of the Trust of which he becomes occupant in respect of his official character and duties, and not as tenant, and shall, if removed from office, deliver up possession of such house and other property to the Committee, or as they direct. He shall not, except with the permission of the Committee, permit any other person to occupy such house or any part thereof.

18. The Governors and Head Master shall give their personal

attention to the duties of their respective offices, and nonc of them, during his tenure of office, shall accept or hold any office or appointment which, in the opinion of the Committee, may interfere with the proper performance of his duties. But this limitation shall not apply to any appointment made by the Conference.

19. No officer of the School shall receive or demand from any boy in the School, or from any person whomsoever on behalf of any such boy, any gratuity, fee, or payment, except such payments as are prescribed or authorised by the Committee.

20. The Committee shall have the general superintendence and management of the School, and may make any regulations not inconsistent with this Scheme. They shall prescribe the general subjects of instruction, the relative prominence and value to be assigned to each group of subjects, the division of the year into School terms and vacations, the school hours, the number of pupils, and the maximum number of holidays to be given in the terms. They shall take general supervision of the sanitary condition of the School-buildings and arrangements. and make all necessary repairs, additions, and improvements. In particular the Committee may, out of such funds as may be placed in their hands for the purpose, enlarge the School-buildings so as to accommodate such number of pupils as the Conference may from time to time direct. They shall determine what number of Assistant-Masters shall be employed. They shall every year assign the amount which they think proper to be paid for the purpose of maintaining Assistant-Masters and other Teachers, and a proper plant or apparatus for carrying on the instruction given in the School.

21. Subject to the rules prescribed by or under the authority of this Scheme, the Governors shall be responsible for the religious instruction and oversight of the School. Subject, as aforesaid, the Governors shall also superintend the domestic management of the School.

22. Subject to the rules prescribed by or under the authority of this Scheme, the Head Master shall have under his control the choice of books, the method of teaching, the arrangement of classes, and generally the whole educational management of the School.

23. The Governor and Head Master jointly shall have the power of giving holidays, not exceeding the maximum number of holidays to be given in the terms.

24. Subject to appeal to the Committee, the Head Master shall be the supreme executive authority in respect of School studies and discipline in School hours, and the Governors in other respects; but the system of discipline shall, as far as possible, be the same throughout, and shall be arranged by the Governor and Head Master in concert. The Governor and Head Master jointly may remove a boy from the School, but his parents or guardians may appeal to the Committee for his restoration.

25. The Governor and Head Master shall jointly have the power of appointing and of dismissing any Assistant-Master or other Teacher, and shall determine in what proportion the sum assigned by the Committee for the maintenance of Assistant-Masters and other Teachers, or of plant or apparatus, ought to be divided among the various persons and objects for the aggregate of which it is assigned; and the Committee shall pay the same accordingly.

26. Any matter on which the Governor and Head Master shall not agree, shall be referred to the Committee.

27. The Governors shall receive such payment as the Conference, after taking into consideration all the circumstances of the case, shall direct.

28. The Head Master shall receive such payment as the Committee from time to time may appoint.

29. Subject to the provisions established by or under the authority of this Scheme, and to the regulations of the Conference from time to time, the School shall be open without charge to the sons of Wesleyan Ministers, or deceased Wesleyan Ministers.

30. If the number of applications for admission should exceed the number of vacancies, the order of admission shall be decided by the Committee, having regard to the special circumstances of each case.

31. No boy shall, without special leave of the Committee, be admitted into the School under the age of ten years, and no boy, without such special leave, shall remain in the School beyond the end of the School term in which he attains the age of nineteen years. And the Governors and Head Master shall make regulations, subject to the approval of the Committee, for the withdrawal of boys from the School in cases where, through idleness or incapacity, they have fallen considerably below the standard of position and attainment proper for their age.

32. No boy shall, without special leave, remain more than six years in the School. Subject to the veto of the Conference, special leave to remain for any further period may be given by the Committee on the recommendation of the Governor and Head Master. Such further period shall be granted either by way of exhibition, or on such payment as the Committee may think fit.

33. Every applicant for admission shall be examined, by or under the direction of the Head Master, who shall appoint convenient times and places for that purpose, and give reasonable notice to the parents. Such examination shall be graduated according to the age of the boy, or other circumstances, at the discretion of the Committee. No boy shall be admitted to the School except on the terms of undergoing such examination, and being found fit for admission. The Committee shall call for a certificate of health, and may, in case of need, call for a certificate of character.

34. There shall be, once in every year, an examination of the School by Examiners appointed for that purpose by the Committee, and paid by them, but otherwise unconnected with the School. The Examiners shall report to the Committee on the proficiency of the scholars, and on the position of the School as regards instruction and disciplinc, as shown by the result of the examination. They shall also mention the name of the boy who has shown the highest attainments, and the names of any other boys who, in their judgment, are worthy of praise or substantial reward. But they need not report any name if in their judgment the result of the examination is wholly unsatisfactory.

35. The Governors and Head Master respectively shall make Annual Reports to the Committee as to the general condition of the School, and as to any special occurrences during the year. They may also mention the names of any boys who, in their judgment, are worthy of praise or substantial reward, having regard both to proficiency and to conduct.

36. The Scholarships now given at the two Schools shall be attached to this School. The Conference Scholarships shall continue to be given.

37. The Committee shall make provision for such further Scholarships and Exhibitions as the funds of the School, or any funds specially given for the purpose, will allow, and, subject to the terms of such gifts, may fix the terms of election to all Scholarships.

38. The School shall be divided into two departments, an Upper School and a Lower School. Subject to the directions, from time to time, of the Committee, the Upper and Lower Schools shall be so arranged that the pupils pass from the Lower to the Upper School at an age of about thirteen years.

39. The Upper School shall be divided into Classical and Modern Departments.

40. Subject to any directions, from time to time, of the Committee, after consultation with the Governors and Head Master as to matters within their respective provinces, the subjects of instruction shall be :---

In both the Schools.—Thorough English education, Biblical instruction, History, Geography, Singing, and Drawing.

Lower School. — Writing, Latin, French, Arithmetic, Elementary Mathematics, and Object-Lessons in Science.

Upper School-Classical Side.-Latin, Greek, French, German, Mathematics, and Physical Science.

Modern Side.—Latin, French, German, Mathematics, Bookkeeping, Land Surveying, Physical Science, and Political Economy.

General.

41. The Committee (or Governing Body) may appoint a Steward or Stewards, and a Matron or Matrons, and fix their salaries and duties.

42. The Committee may receive donations or endowments for the general purposes of the School, or for any Scholarships, Exhibitions, or other special purposes of the School.

43. If the Conference shall, at any time, resolve to admit to the School boys not the sons of Wesleyan Ministers, the Committee may admit such boys on such terms as they, subject to any Resolutions of the Conference, shall think expedient. In that case the Committee may extend the School, either on the hostel or house system.

44. The Committee shall make, in the month of July in each year, a Report to the Conference, on the state of the School; such Report to be accompanied by the Auditor's Report.

45. The expenses of the School shall be defrayed by the Committee out of such moneys as shall, under the authority of the Conference, be paid over to them by the General Committee of the Schools' Fund.

46. The Committee may, with the sanction of the Conference, alter this Scheme.

The Rev. Edwin H. Tindall read the Report for the year 1874-5, of which the following is an Abstract :---

The Income from all Sources is $\pm 9,204$ 4s. 4d., being an increase from ordinary sources of ± 167 7s. 2d.

The Subscriptions and Collections for the "North Wales Chapel Fund" amount to $\pounds 602$ 15s. 8d., being an increase on the year of $\pounds 11$ 7s. 9d.

The Subscriptions and Collections for the "South Wales Chapel Fund" amount to £30 15s. 1d.

I. BUILDING DEPARTMENT.

Erections sanctioned.

122 Chapels, at an estimated cost of $\pm 196,052$; 21 Ministers' houses, $\pm 19,191$; 19 School Rooms, $\pm 21,947$; 64 Enlargements and Alterations, $\pm 32,443$; 73 Modifications, $\pm 27,291$; 34 Organs, $\pm 8,130$, have been sanctioned by the Committee. This is a decrease of 53 cases and $\pm 32,381$, compared with last year. The temporary debt sanctioned is $\pm 51,069$, being $16\frac{3}{4}$ per cent. The aid promised by the Committee to new Chapels is, in Grants, $\pm 2,147$; in Loans, $\pm 11,795$.

Sales.

The Committee have sanctioned the sale of 41 Chapels, 5 Schools, 7 Ministers' houses, 4 cottages, and 6 plots of land. 39 Chapels, 4 Schools, and 7 Ministers' houses, are to be superseded by more commodious erections.

Erections completed.

In the following cases the conditions agreed upon with the Committee have been observed :—74 Chapels, costing £135,054; 9 Ministers' houses, £6,460; 13 School Rooms, £8,878; 56 Enlargements, etc., £46,984; 29 Organs, £6,098. In 54 cases the debt is larger than the amount allowed by £9,830.

There are also 26 cases for which Connexional sanction was not sought, and on which the per-centage of debt is $39\frac{1}{3}$. The entire outlay, £13,376. These cases are more than last year by 6. During the year the Committee have paid towards new Chapels,—Grants, £2,435; Loans, £4,650.

II. RELIEF DEPARTMENT.

Grants.

To the Trustees of 72 Chapels $\pounds 2,615$ have been paid. On 29 of these no debt now remains.

Loans.

The Loan instalments received during the year, have amounted to $\pounds 8,405$ 5s. 4d. on the *Relief* account, and $\pounds 2,589$ 10s. on the *Erections'-Fund* account. The Loans now in operation are 493. $\pounds 7,220$ have been advanced to meet $\pounds 8,970$ raised by Trustees. The South Wales Loan Committee have advanced $\pounds 58$ to meet the same amount raised by the Trustees; and the North Wales Committee have advanced $\pounds 1,400$ in Loans.

III. LOCAL EFFORTS.

The sums paid off by local efforts and surplus income are $\pm 23,907$

Contributions to Circuit Funds.

2,721 Trusts have contributed £32,853, being an increase of 120 Trusts, and £1,788 in contributions.

IV. SUMMARY.

The total amount of debts discharged is $\pm 54,548$, making $\pm 1,072,540$ in the last 21 years.

The total sum contributed in Great Britain, in the last year, as far as ascertained, is £262,292.

V. GENERAL MANAGEMENT OF TRUST ESTATES.

The returns include particulars relating to 6,443 separate Trust Estates. There is an increase of 346 in the number insured against fire, and of 195 in the number free from debt.

VI. LEGAL AFFAIRS.

Various applications to the Board of Charity Commissioners relating to Trust property have been approved by the Committee and certified during the year to the President for his signature.

Considerable inconvenience is still experienced owing to the difference in opinion respecting the value of the stamps which it is necessary to affix to an Instrument by which new Trustees are appointed and the legal estate in the property is vested. To remove this inconvenience, and in order to obtain an authoritative decision on this matter, the Committee have given instructions for the preparation of a case to be submitted to the Court of Exchequer.

DEBT ON WESLEYAN-METHODIST TRUST PROPERTY.

There are 1,071 Trusts, together paying £5,898 annually as ground rent. The capitalized value of this sum, taken at twenty years' purchase, would amount to £117,960. Add this to the sum returned as debt on interest, and the total amount of the liabilities on Connexional Trust Property in Great Britain, in 1875, will then stand at £894,577, or £374,152 less than the debt on interest alone as returned in 1855. During that period no less than £3,511,704 have been expended on the purchase, erection, or enlargement of Wesleyan-Methodist Trust Property.

The following Resolutions were adopted :---

Moved by the Rev. G. T. Perks, M.A.; seconded by Mr. John Beauchamp:

1. That this Meeting rejoices to learn, from the facts now first made public, that the total amount of debt on Wesleyan Trust Properties, in Great Britain, is much smaller in proportion to the aggregate value of such Properties than when the Annual Returns were first made; yet it is convinced that the amount of such debt is still so large as to render it necessary that efforts for its gradual reduction and ultimate extinction should be continued with undiminished vigour.

Moved by the Rev. Thomas Llewellyn; seconded by Sir Francis Lycett:

2. That this Meeting finds great satisfaction in the continued efforts which are being made to meet the spiritual wants of needy localities by providing additional Chapel-accommodation, and that new Chapels are in course of erection in villages and among rural populations, as well as in our large towns and great centrcs of industry. It, however, feels that the additional accommodation already provided, although very considerable, has not been adequate to meet the requirements of the case, and it earnestly trusts that such an augmentation of the Funds at the disposal of the Chapel Committee and other Connexional Committees may be made, as will enable them to give greater encouragement to local enterprise and liberality.

Moved by the Rev. G. Blanchflower; seconded by Mr. Wayman: 3. That the thanks of this Meeting be presented to the District Chapel Secretaries and Committees, to the Circuit Chapel Secretaries, and to the Ministers and Trustees who have acted with them, for their valuable services to this Department of Methodism.

Moved by the Rev. John M'Kenny; seconded by Mr. John Long:

4. That the thanks of this Meeting be presented to Messrs. Healey and Haworth, the Treasurers; to the Rev. Messrs. Edwards and Tindall, the General Secretaries; to the Rev. John Bedford, Secretary of the Board of Trustees for Chapel Purposes; and to the Committee, for their diligent and faithful services.

METROPOLITAN WESLEYAN CHAPEL BUILDING FUND.

THE following Statement was read by the Secretary:-

During the year five additional sites have been secured at a cost of $\pm 4,880$, towards which the Committee have advanced in loans £3,850. Three commodious Chapels have been opened during the year; two others are nearly completed, and two more are about to be commenced. Five erections have been sanctioned since July, 1874, which will cost upwards of £36,000; towards this sum the Committee have made grants of £11,250, and loans to the amount of $\pm 3,750$. The repayment of loans during the year is exceptionally large, viz., $\pounds 3,118$; ten of the trusts which have had loans to the extent of £6,000 during the last thirteen years, have now entirely repaid the amounts. Since the commencement of the Fund the total amount of loans voted for sites is upwards of $\pm 22,500$, and for erections about $\pm 29,000$. So that the Loan Fund has been made available to the extent of nearly $\pm 52,000$. Grants from the Ordinary and Special Fund ±62,000.

The Committee do not wish to intimate that all these results have been realised by the direct means of the Fund. They gratefully recognise the other agencies of Methodism which God is pleased to employ, both ministerial and financial. But while they desire to give God all the glory, they thankfully record their sense of that mercy which has enabled them to unite with others in those efforts which have been so signally successful.

The following general results have been realised :—Number of Chapels erected, or in course of erection, including two small School Chapels, and two enlargements, 46; number of sittings provided, 43,000; amount of loans, about £38,000; amount of grants, £27,225; actual cost, say, £280,000.

It may also be stated that since the Fund was commenced in 1861, and apart from the operations of the Fund, more than seventy smaller places of worship,—including School Rooms, Iron Chapels, and Halls,—providing sixteen thousand sittings, have been built or hired; so that increased accommodation to the extent of near sixty thousand sittings has been secured in the Metropolitan Districts during the last thirteen years. The Special Fund now amounts to $\pounds 65,780$ 16s. 9d.

The Committee, however, are greatly distressed at the inadequacy of the Income. Not only is the ordinary Fund exhausted, but grants and loans to the extent of several thousands of pounds have been voted, which the Committee are unable to Nothing short of a general and united effort each year pay. throughout London can meet the case. An appeal has been made to the two London District Meetings for sympathy and help. The subject was discussed in each Meeting when the laymen were The Second London District Meeting unanimously present. asked the Conference to appoint Annual Collections in each Metropolitan Chapel, and to recommend that an Annual Public Meeting be held in each Metropolitan Circuit. The First London District Meeting adopted the same Resolutions in a somewhat modified form. The Committee earnestly desire the help of the Conference.

1. That this Meeting desires gratefully to acknowledge the success which has attended the operations of the Fund, and especially rejoices in the spiritual benefits which have been conferred on many in the congregations which have been gathered through its aid. The Meeting is, however, concerned to hear that the present resources of the Fund are inadequate to the demands upon it, resulting from the increase of the population of the metropolis and its suburbs : and it desires to commend to the Conference the suggestions of the District Committees of the two London Districts, with a view to the augmentation of its Income.

In the meantime the Committee trusts that he may be filled with all joy and consolation, and that the faith and peace which have been so remarkably vouchsafed to him may be abundantly increased.

MEETING OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE OF REVIEW,

HELD IN SHEFFIELD, JULY 23RD, 1875.

PRESENT, the Rev. W M. PUNSHON, LL.D., President of the Conference, in the Chair; the Rev. Gervase Smith, M.A., Secretary of the Conference; the Rev. G. T. Perks, M.A., Ex-President of the Conference; the Rev. Theophilus Woolmer and Mr. Isaac Hoyle, the Treasurers; the Rev. J. H. Rigg, D.D., and the Rev. G. W Olver, B.A., Principals of the two Training Colleges; the Rev. John Clulow, Visitor of Day and Sunday Schools, and Secretary of the Connexional Sunday-School Union; the Rev. T. B. Stephenson, B.A., Principal of the Children's Home; the Rev. G. O. Bate, Secretary of the Education Committee; and a number of Ministers and laymen invited to attend in accordance with the Resolution of the Conference, 1874.

1. A digest of the proceedings of the Education Committee during the year was read.

2. The Report of the Education Committee on the establishment of Middle-Class Schools, was presented, and proposals for the formation of District Sunday-School Sub-Committees. and for the working and management of Provincial Centres of the Connexional Sunday-School Union, were also submitted.

3. Statistics of Wesleyan Day and Sunday Schools were presented. (See pages 791,792.)

4. The Rev. John Clulow presented an Abstract of the proceedings of the Union Sub-Committee during the year. These included arrangements for Publication, the Central Agencies, Grants to Libraries, Provincial Centres, District Sub-Committees, Organization, and Funds.

5. The Treasurers presented a Financial Statement.

6. The Principal of "The Children's Home" presented an Abstract of the Report of that Institution, which stated that three hundred children were in residence in the four Branches of the Home, and that two hundred and seventy children had been sent forth to earn their living by honest labour. The Report also included statements respecting the Training Department of the Home; its Head-quarters in London; the Branches in Lancashire and Canada, a new Branch at Milton, Kent; Missions to Children and the adult Poor; the proposed Training Ship on the Thames; and the Financial position of the Institution. The following Resolutions were unanimously adopted :---

Moved by the Rev. Dr. Williams; seconded by Mr. H. J. Atkinson, of London; supported by Mr. H. Mitchell, Mayor of Bradford:

1. This Committee rejoices to find that the large and continued increase in the means of public elementary education effected by recent legislation—the benefit of which to the country it heartily recognises—has not interfered to any serious extent with the maintenance of our Connexional Day-School system. The Committee regards it as very desirable on many grounds that this branch of Methodist educational work be maintained in full strength and efficiency, and is of opinion that the systematic visitation of all our Schools would contribute largely to this result. At the same time this Committee hopes that in many parts of the country it will be found practicable to establish Methodist Middle-Class Schools, on the basis of the plan which has been prepared by the Education Committee.

Moved by the Rev. G. W Olver, B.A.; seconded by Mr. Dyson, of Thurgoland; supported by the Rev. James Clapham:

2. This Committee regards the establishment of the Connexional Sunday-School Union as an event of special interest; it is thankful for the success which has thus far attended the undertaking, and is very desirous that the organization of the Union should be so completed that facilities may speedily be afforded for placing every Sunday-School of the Connexion as fully as possible within reach of the various benefits which the Union can confer. The Committee hopes that all Wesleyan Sunday-Schools will soon be connected with the Union, and that the financial means necessary for the satisfactory outworking of its plans will be amply provided. In order to this, and in view of other important interests with which the Education Committee is entrusted, this Committee urges the importance of a very liberal support of the Education Fund, in addition to specific subscriptions on behalf of the funds of the Union.

Moved by the Rev. G. T. Perks, M.A.; seconded by Mr. James E. Vanner, London:

3. This Committee of Review receives with much satisfaction the Report of the Children's Home; it rejoices in the success of its several Branches, and especially in the work of God's grace wrought in many of the children. The Committee is thankful that the Christian public generally, and particularly Sundayscholars and children of godly families, have displayed deep interest in the Institution and given it liberal support. The Committee also hears with pleasure that a certified Training Ship for Boys is likely to be placed upon the Thames; that the Government have put a Ship at the disposal of a Provisional Committee formed to secure and equip a vessel for this purpose; and that the Ship, when equipped, is intended to be placed under the management of the Committee of the Children's Home.

Moved by the Rev. Dr. Jobson; seconded by Mr. W S. Allen, M.P.; supported by the Rev. J. A. Macdonald:

4. Having been informed that the Rev. John Clulow intends to ask the Conference to release him from the joint offices of Visitor of Day and Sunday Schools and Secretary of the Connexional Sunday-School Union, this Committee heartily thanks Mr. Clulow for the very valuable services which he has rendered to this Department of Connexional Work during the last eleven years, and records its high appreciation of the assiduity and ability with which he has laboured to promote the efficiency of Wesleyan-Methodist Sunday and Day Schools.

DAY-SCHOOLS.

Three inspected Schools were opened during the year in new buildings, and 20 were commenced in existing buildings. Forty-one Outfit Grants to 43 Departments were paid, amounting to £1,583.

The number of Certificated Teachers employed in Wesleyan Schools on the 31st of December, 1874, was 940.

The number of Pupil-Teachers and Candidates returned in March last was 1,942, being a decrease on the corresponding period of the previous year of eight. 1,808 Pupil-Teachers and Candidates sat for Examination in Religious Knowledge. The Report of the Board of Examiners was presented to the General Education Committee in April last, and an Abstract has since been published.

ABSTRACT OF REPORT OF THE CHILDREN'S HOME.

THE CHILDREN'S HOME has now 300 children in residence in its four Branches, and has sent forth 270 children to earn their living by honest labour. Besides this, THE HOME is training a number of godly young men and women for Christian service; and, further, by its Mission establishments in the East of London, it is influencing a large number of adults, as well as about 500 children of the poor of Bethnal Green.

The religious power, which is the soul of the work, has been graciously maintained during the year. Many conversions have taken place in connection with each Branch of THE HOME.

The Training Department, though small, becomes increasingly important; and an extension of it is most desirable, so soon as the funds will allow. Up to the present time, nineteen probationers have been received for training,—ten young men and nine young women. Of these eleven have completed their period of training. There are now resident, two male and six female probationers. Of these, some are persons who from the highest motives are bringing to the work considerable social and educational advantages. Lectures are given to the probationers on the Science of Education and Holy Scripture.

The Green-Street Mission for adults, and the Children's Mission in Bonner-Lane, have maintained the success of previous years. There are about thirty members of the Church in connection with them.

A new Branch of THE HOME, certified by the Home Secretary, for the reception of boys, has been opened at Milton, near Gravesend. Excellent premises, with twenty acres of ground adjacent, have been secured on lease for twenty-one years. Here we shall have accommodation for upwards of one hundred boys. The London School Board has promised £1,000 towards the expenses of establishment. Forty-five boys are already in residence.

The premises at the head-quarters in London which were purchased just before the close of last year have been greatly improved and enlarged. But the erection of the new chapel and school-room is postponed, for want of funds. One hundred and sixty children are now resident in London.

The Lancashire Branch has been greatly improved by the completion of the buildings. Eighty children are in residence; and, through the blessing of God, a very high religious tone has been maintained during the year.

The year's work of the Canadian Branch has been exceedingly important. One hundred and thirty children have been sent out during the twelve months; and the whole of the two hundred and twenty ehildren whom we have now in Canada have been thoroughly visited and eared for. All the ehildren, except a few little boys who are kept at Hamilton for further training, have got excellent situations.

A number of children have been placed satisfactorily in situations in England: amongst them were some very interesting eases of adoption.

This year has also been remarkable for the commencement of an enterprise which will probably place a training ship for boys under the eare of the Committee, as a fifth branch of THE HOME. It was felt, however, that, in the present state of the finances, the Committee would not be justified in undertaking the responsibility of such a scheme. A Provisional Committee was therefore formed, with the Lord Mayor of London at its head, for the purpose of securing from the Government a suitable ship, and equipping it, with the understanding that THE CHILDREN'S HOME would guarantee £500 towards the expenses of outfit, and would undertake the management and maintenance of the ship when afloat. That Committee has met with considerable success in its appeal for funds, and the Government have promised to lend Her Majesty's ship "Conqueror" for this purpose. At present, however, though they look upon this scheme with keen interest and warm sympathy, the Committee of THE HOME is not responsible for it, nor can it assume any responsibility until the entire cost of supplying and equipping the ship is provided.

The largest income is reported that has yet been received; and especially gratifying are the liberality and sympathy shown by Sunday-Schools. But the extensive additional buildings, and other expenses incident to the rapid growth of the work, have crippled us in reference to ordinary demands, so that there is now a considerable floating debt, in addition to the liability incurred by the purchase of the London premises. All further extension in any direction must be stayed until the finances are brought into a sound condition. The friends of THE HOME must therefore understand that no further step can be taken, nor any additional children received (except as a few vacancies may occur), until the whole of the current liabilities are removed, and at least £500 paid off from the loan for the purchase of the London premises.

1. THE Ex-President reported that he had given due notice, in writing under his hand, to two of the Trustees appointed by the Deed of August 30th, 1872, that the Conference directed such Trustees, on payment to them of the moneys specified by such Deed, to convey the property vested in them by such Deed, to such persons, and upon such trusts, as mentioned in the Minutes of 1874.

2. The Rev. G. W. Olver, B.A., reported that the Rev. W Arthur, M.A., and he had taken measures for the constitution of the Governing Body of the Leys School, as referred to in the Minutes of 1874, on Higher Education, elause 5 (p. 444 of this Volume), and that the Governing Body had been duly constituted accordingly, and consisted of the following persons:

Secretaries of the Governing Body, and by the President, Ex-President, and Secretary of the Conference, is presented to the Conference. And that by the said Memorandum in writing, dated the 28th day of July, 1875, and signed by the President, Ex-President, and Secretary of the Conference, the said Scheme was approved.

THE MEMORANDUM ABOVE REFERRED TO IS AS FOLLOWS :---SHEFFIELD, July 28th, 1875.

REFERRING to the Printed Minutes of the Wesleyan Conference, 1874, p. 197*, Clauses 6, 7, and 8, we, the undersigned, William Morley Punshon, George Thomas Perks, and Gervase Smith, being respectively the President, Ex-President, and Secretary of the said Conference, hereby approve the persons named in the Schedule hereto, as the Trustees of the property of the Leys School, Cambridge, and also hereby approve the Scheme of Trusts of the property of the School, a printed copy of which is this day signed by us; and is also signed by the Rev. SCHEME OF THE LEYS SCHOOL, CAMBRIDGE.

I.-NAME AND OBJECT.

1. The name of the foundation shall be "The Leys School, Cambridge."

2. The object of the foundation is the establishment of a School to provide high-class education. The religious teaching in the School shall be in accordance with that of the Wesleyan-Methodist Conference, which Conference is a Body established by a Deed Poll, executed by the Rev. John Wesley, and dated the 28th of February, 1784, and enrolled in Chancery on the 9th of March, 1784.

II.-NOMINATIONS, LIFE DONORS, AND DONORS.

3. Every person who, being approved by the Governing Body, shall subscribe £100 to the funds of the School, shall be a Life Donor of the School, and shall have the right of nominating, from time to time, during his life, a pupil to the School, so as to have always a nominee in the School. In case of his death within ten years from the first of February, 1875, or the date of his subscription (whichever date shall last arrive), the right may be exercised during the remainder of the ten years by his legal personal representatives, or by such other persons as he shall by will direct. Such right is called a nomination. The same person may hold more than one nomination. Nominations shall not be transferable; and upon the lunacy, bankruptey, or liquidation of the affairs of the holder, or upon attempted alienation by him, shall vest in the Governing Body for the time being, who may cither cancel the same, or use, exercise, or deal with the same as they may think fit. After the first 250 nominations shall have been taken up, the Governing Body may, if they think fit, alter the amount to be subscribed for a nomination.

4. The Life Donors who shall hold the 250 nominations first subscribed for shall be First Life Donors of the School.

5. The present Life Donors are the persons named in Schedule A hereto who hold 150 of the said 250 nominations. The remainder have not yet been subscribed for.

6. The annual charge for the board and education (exclusive of extras, if any) of the nominee of a First Life Donor shall be ten guineas less than the charge for the same things made to a pupil of the same age, not the nominee of a First Life Donor, or of a Donor. This clause only applies to the nominees of the First Life Donors, and not to those of subsequent Life Donors.

7 Any person who, being approved by the Governing Body, shall subscribe $\pounds 50$ to the funds of the School, shall be a Donor of the School, and have the right of once nominating a pupil to the School. If such nomince shall cease to be in the School within five years from his nomination, then the Donor may nominate a pupil in his place, from time to time, during five years from the first nomination. If a Donor shall die within ten years after the date of his subscription, without having exercised his right, the right may be exercised within that period by his legal personal representatives, or by such other persons as he may by will direct.

8. The annual charge for board and education (exclusive of extras, if any) of the nominee of a Donor who shall subscribe before the first 250 nominations have been taken up, shall, during the five years next following the first nomination by the Donor, be ten guineas less than the charge for the same things made to a pupil of the same age not the nominee of a First Life Donor or of a Donor.

9. The nominees of Life Donors and Donors shall, in respect of discipline and regulations of admission, and in all other respects, except that of the reduced charge hereby provided for, be in the same position as other pupils (if any).

10. A Life Donor or Donor shall not exercise or enjoy any of the privileges of his position until his subscription has been paid up. But the Governing Body may, in any particular cases, dispense with this clause, and give time, and accept payment by instalments, with or without security, and at such interest as they think fit.

III.-GOVERNING BODY.

11. The affairs of the foundation shall be managed by a Governing Body, who shall have all powers in reference thereto, except in cases where their powers are limited by this Scheme.

12. The Governing Body may procure incorporation, and if they do so may require the property of the foundation to be vested in them. Until they do so, they may, with the consent of the President of the Conference, from time to time, appoint new Trustees of the property, in the place of any Trustees dying, or becoming lunatic, or bankrupt, or going into liquidation, or refusing to act, or desiring to be discharged.

13. The Trustees may, with the sanction of the Governing Body, procure incorporation.

14. The President, Ex-President, and Secretary, for the time being, of the Conference, shall be ex-officio members of the Governing Body. There shall be (subject to sub-section (d)below) seventeen other Members, to be called Elected Members, who shall be elected as follows, namely :--

(a) Eleven by the Life Donors.

(b) Three by the Wesleyan Education Committee, (which is a Committee annually appointed by the Conference). One of these three is to be the Principal of one of the Wesleyan Training Colleges.

- (c) Two by the Officers (that is to say, by the Theological and Classical Tutors, House Governors, and Assistant Tutors, being Ministers in full Connexion with the Conference) of the Branches of the Wesleyan Theological Institution (which is an Institution maintained under the direction of the Conference).
- (d) One by the resident Masters of the School. But, until there shall be five resident Masters of the School, no election by the Masters of the School shall take place, and in the meantime there shall be only sixteen Elected Members of the Governing Body.

15. The first Elected Members (other than the Member to be first elected by the resident Masters) shall be the following persons :---

- (a) The REV. WILLIAM ARTHUR, M.A., London, SIR FRANCIS LYCETT, Knight, London, WILLIAM M'ARTHUR, ESq., M.P., London, WILLIAM MEWBURN, ESq., Banbury, JAMES S. SUTCLIFFE, ESq., Baeup, JOSEPH RYDER, ESq., Cambridge, HENRY MITCHELL, ESq., Bradford, HENRY JOHN ATKINSON, ESq., London, SAMUEL BUDGETT, ESq., Bristol, S. RATHBONE EDGE, ESq., Newcastle-under-Lyme, and PERCY WILLIAM BUNTING, ESq., London, (who have been elected by the Life Donors;)
- (b) The REV. JAMES H. RIGG, D.D. (Principal of the Wesleyan Training College, Westminster),

The REV. GEORGE WILLIAM OLVER, B.A. (Principal of the Wesleyan Training College, Battersca), and

T. PERCIVAL BUNTING, Esq., London, (who have been elected by the Wesleyan Education Committee ;) and

(c) The REV. BENJAMIN HELLIER, Headingley, and The REV. W. F. MOULTON, D.D., Riehmond, (who have been elected by the Officers of the Wesleyan Theological Institution).

The past aets and proceedings of the Governing Body up to the date of this Deed are hereby confirmed.

16. The said first Elected Members, and the Member to be first elected by the resident Masters, shall hold office until the 1st of February, 1878, and theneeforward until their retirement in rotation, as herein provided.

17 The Elected Members shall retire from office in rotation, five retiring on the 1st of February in each year, and the first retirement taking place on the 1st of February, 1878. The Elected Members to retire in any year, shall be the five who shall

1875.

have been longest in office, and as among Members who shall have been the same time in office, the members to retire shall be determined by ballot.

18. Notwithstanding Clause 17, Members retiring in rotation shall continue to hold office until the appointment of their successors.

19. On every retirement in rotation of an Elected Member, his place shall be supplied by election by the same body which elected him.

20. Except in the case of the first Head Master, Dr. Moulton, (whose service on the Governing Body in the first establishment of the School is deemed essential,) no Master of the School shall be a Member of the Governing Body.

21. The office of an Elected Member shall be vacated-

- (a) By his death.
- (b) By his voluntary retirement, to be signified by him to the Governing Body in writing under his hand.
- (c) By his becoming lunatic, or bankrupt, or by the liquidation of his affairs, or
- (d) By his neglecting for twelve months together to attend any meeting of the Governing Body

22. Any vacancy in the office of an Elected Member, occasioned in the manner mentioned in the last clause, shall be filled up by the election by the Governing Body of a Member in his place, who shall for all purposes (including retirement in rotation) stand in the place of the Member so replaced.

23. Retiring Members of the Governing Body shall be reeligible.

24. If the number of nominations held by Life Donors shall fall below one hundred, the number of Members of the Governing Body to be elected by the Life Donors shall be reduced to seven; and if the number of nominations held by Life Donors shall fall below fifty, the number of Members of the Governing Body to be elected by the Life Donors shall be reduced to three; and if the number of nominations held by Life Donors shall fall below ten, their right of electing Members of the Governing Body shall cease altogether. The places on the Governing Body, the right of election to which shall thus lapse, shall be filled alternately by the Governing Body for the time being, by way of co-optation, and by such body or bodies as the Conference shall appoint in that behalf. After this clause shall come into force, the number of laymen in the Governing Body shall not fall below ten.

25. The Governing Body may act, notwithstanding vacancies in their number.

26. The Governing Body may fix their own times and places of Meeting, their mode of summoning Meetings and transacting business, their quorum and procedure. They may appoint Officers and Committees with such powers as they think fit. They shall 27. The Accounts of the School, up to the 31st of December in each year, shall be audited, within three months after that time, by a Professional Auditor. No Member of the Governing Body shall be an Auditor.

IV.-MODE OF ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF THE GOVERNING BODY.

28. The Election by Life Donors of a Member of the Governing Body shall be made at a Meeting of the Life Donors; and for this purpose the Governing Body shall summon such a Meeting within three months after the vacancy to be supplied.

29. The Election by the Wesleyan Education Committee of a Member of the Governing Body shall be made at a Meeting of that Committee according to the usual conduct of its business, but a week's special notice of the Election shall be given to the Members of the Committee.

30. The Election by the Officers of the Wesleyan Theological Institution of a Member of the Governing Body shall be made by means of voting papers, each Officer having one vote. The Governing Body shall appoint the time of the Election, and shall give four weeks' notice thereof by post to each Officer. The name of any person nominated by any Officer for Election shall be sent by him to the Governing Body two weeks before the Election; and one week before the Election the Governing Body shall send notice of all such nominations to all the Officers. The voting papers shall be sent (by post or otherwise) to, and opened by, and the result declared by such person or persons as the Governing Body shall appoint. A certificate of the result of the Election, under the hand of the person or persons so appointed, shall be sufficient primâ facie evidence of such result, and of the due observance of all proceedings of the Election. Notice of the result of the Election shall be forthwith sent to all the Officers.

V.—MEETINGS OF LIFE DONORS.

31. The Governing Body shall summon a Meeting of the Life Donors once every year, and may summon such a Meeting whenever they deem it expedient.

32. The Governing Body shall fix the place, day, and hour of every Meeting of the Life Donors, and shall give fourteen days' notice thereof by post to each Life Donor, speeifying the business. For the purpose of notice, each Life Donor shall give to the Governing Body an address in the United Kingdom, and may notify any changes thereof, from time to time, to the Governing Body, and notice to him in the usual course of post at the last address given shall be sufficient. The President of the Conference, or, in his absence, the Vice-Chairman of the Governing Body, or, failing him, a Member of the Governing Body, to be chosen by the Meeting, shall take the Chair. The quorum of a Meeting of Life Donors shall be five Life Donors. The Chairman may, with the consent of the Meeting, adjourn the Meeting. Minutes of the Meeting shall be kept; and when purporting to be signed by the Chairman of a subsequent Meeting, shall be *primâ facie* evidence of the proceedings.

33. Each Life Donor shall have one vote for every nomination held by him, but shall cease to have any vote if his nomination cease to be held by him (see Clause 3). After the death of a Life Donor, no person shall have any right of voting in respect of his nomination. Votes may be given either personally or by proxy, but the instrument appointing a proxy must be in writing signed by the appointer, and the proxy must be a Life Donor. Notice of the appointment of the proxy must be sent to the Governing Body at least three days before the Meeting.

VI.-THE SCHOOL AND ITS MANAGEMENT.

34. The Chief Officer of the School shall be the Head Master, who shall be appointed by the Governing Body, and must be a graduate of a University in Great Britain or Ireland.

35. The Governing Body may dismiss the Head Master without assigning cause on six months' notice; but the Resolution dismissing him must be passed at two consecutive meetings of the Governing Body, held at an interval of not more than four weeks, or less than two weeks.

36. Nevertheless, for urgent cause, the Governing Body may, by Resolution passed at a Special Meeting duly convened for that express purpose, and affirmed by not less than two-thirds of the whole existing Governing Body, suspend the Head Master from his office, and make temporary provision for the discharge of his duties. Full notice and opportunity of defence, both against such dismissal and such suspension, shall be given to the Head Master.

37. Every Head Master, previously to entering into office, shall be required to sign a declaration, to be entered in the Minute Book of the Governing Body, in the following form:—

"I, declare that I will always, to the best "of my ability, discharge the duties of Head Master of the Leys "School, Cambridge, during my tenure of the office, and that if "I am removed by the Governing Body according to the con-"stitution of the said School, I will acquiesce in such removal, "and will thereupon relinquish all claim to the Mastership and "its emoluments, and will deliver up to the Governing Body, or "as they direct, possession of all their property then in my "possession or occupation."

38. The Head Master shall reside in the dwelling-house assigned for his residence. He shall have the occupation and use

of such house, and any other property of the Foundation of which he becomes occupant, not as tenant, but in respect of his official character and duties, and shall, if removed from office, deliver up possession of such house and other property to the Governing Body, or as they direct. He shall not, except with the permission of the Governing Body, permit any other person to occupy such house or any part thereof.

39. The Head Master shall give his personal attention to the duties of his office, and during his tenure of office shall not accept or hold any office or appointment which, in the opinion of the Governing Body, may interfere with the proper performance of his duties.

40. No officer of the School shall demand or receive from any boy in the School, or from any person whomsoever on behalf of any such boy, any gratuity, fee, or payment, except such payments as are prescribed or authorised by the Governing Body.

41. The Head Master shall have the religious, educational, and domestic management of the School, and shall prescribe the subjects of instruction, the books, the arrangement of classes, the School-hours, the holidays during term, and the discipline. He shall have the power of expelling a pupil for immorality, wilful breach of discipline, or other flagrant misconduct; subject to an appeal to a tribunal of three persons: one to be nominated by himself, one by the Governing Body, and the third by the President of the Conference; and he may suspend the pupil pending the appeal. He shall report to the Governing Body every case of expulsion. He shall have the power, without appeal, of requiring a boy to be removed from the School. He shall, subject to the veto of the Governing Body, appoint the Assistant Masters, and any other teachers. He may dismiss Assistant Masters and teachers at his pleasure.

42. In all matters not otherwise hereby provided for, the Governing Body shall have the management of the School. In particular (and without limiting the generality of their powers) they shall prescribe the number of pupils, the length of terms and vacations, the salaries of the masters, teachers, officers, and servants, and shall direct the expenditure and manage the finances of the School. They shall, from time to time, in their discretion, erect, add to, alter, and repair the School-buildings, and all convenient appurtenances, including (so soon as they think fit) a School Chapel, and may, for the purposes of the School, hire buildings and premises, and let the same, or any of the existing School premises. They shall prescribe the notice to be required for the removal of a pupil. They shall prescribe the ordinary and extra charges and fees for pupils. [But, unless with the consent of a meeting of the First Life Donors, to be called and held in the same manner and under the same regulations as prescribed for meetings of Life Donors in Clauses 31, 32, and 33, the ordinary charges for board and education (exclusive of extras, if any) shall not exceed, for nominecs of First Life Donors or Donors while entitled to the benefit of reduced charges under Clauses 6 and 8, seventy guineas per annum.]

43. Subject to the provisions of this Scheme, and to the approval of the Governing Body, the School shall be open to all boys nominated by Life Donors or Donors. And if, after providing for all such boys, there be vacancies in the School, the Governing Body may admit other boys.

44. If the number of applications for admission should exceed the number of vacancies, the order of admission shall be decided by the Governing Body, having regard to the special circumstances of each case. But this is not to affect the priority of nominated boys over other boys, or the priority amongst nominated boys of those entitled to the benefit of reduced charges under Clauses 6 and 8.

45. No boy shall, without special leave of the Governing Body, be admitted into the School under the age of ten years, and no boy, without such special leave, shall remain in the School beyond the end of the School term in which he attains the age of nincteen years. And the Head Master shall make regulations, subject to the approval of the Governing Body, for the withdrawal of boys from the School in eases where, through idleness or incapacity, they have fallen below the standard of position and attainment proper for their age.

46. Every applicant for admission shall be examined by, or under the direction of, the Head Master, who shall appoint convenient times and places for that purpose, and give reasonable notices to the parents. No boy shall be admitted to the School except on the terms of undergoing such examination and being found fit for admission. The Head Master shall call for a certificate of health, and may, if he think fit, call for a certificate of character.

47 The examination for admission shall be graduated according to the age of the boy, and according to a standard to be fixed by the Head Master, with the approval of the Governing Body.

48. There shall be, once in every year after 1875, an examination of the School by Examiners appointed for that purpose by the Governing Body, and paid by them, but otherwise unconnected with the School. The Examiners shall report to the Governing Body on the proficiency of the scholars and on the position of the School, as regards instruction and discipline, as shown by the result of the examination. They shall also mention the name of the boy who has shown the highest attainments, and the names of any other boys who, in their judgment, are worthy of praise or substantial reward. But they need not report any name if, in their judgment, the result of the examination is unsatisfactory.

49. The Head Master shall make Annual Reports to the Governing Body as to the general condition of the School, and as to any special occurrences during the year. He may also mention the names of any boys who, in his judgment, are worthy of praise or substantial reward, having regard both to proficiency and to conduct.

50. The Governing Body shall make provision for such Scholarships, Exhibitions, and prizes as the funds of the School, or any funds specially given for the purpose, will allow, and, subject to the terms of such gifts, may fix the terms of election thereto.

51. The School shall be divided into two departments, an Upper School and a Lower School. Subject to the directions, from time to time, of the Governing Body, the Upper and Lower Schools shall be so arranged that the pupils pass from the Lower to the Upper School at an age of about thirteen years.

52. The Upper School shall, as soon as convenient, having regard to the number of pupils, be divided into Classical and Modern Departments.

$\mathbf{VII.} \leftarrow \mathbf{UENERAL}.$

53. The Governing Body may receive donations or endowments for the general purposes of the School, or for any Scholarships, Exhibitions, or prizes, or any other special purposes of the School.

54. The Governing Body may borrow money with or without security. They may issue debentures, and may mortgage any of the School property with power of sale and all other usual powers. They may let on lease or otherwise, and for building or repairing purposes or otherwise, and for such terms and with such powers as they think expedient, and may sell any part of the property of the School. They may buy, or take on lease, land of any tenure. Any sale by them may be made together or in parcels, and either by public auction or private contract, and with or without any special or other conditions as to title, or evidence of title, or otherwise. They may rescind or vary any contract for sale, and re-sell without being responsible for loss, and may give good discharges for purchase money.

55. The powers specified in the last Clause may be exercised by the Governing Body in their discretion, except that the consent of a Meeting of the Life Donors, and of the President of the Conference, shall be required to authorize any money beyond the amount of two-thirds of the total amount of subscriptions to the School being on loan to the Governing Body at any one time, or to authorize any sale or any lease for a longer period than twenty-one years of any part of the Leys Estate hereby conveyed. 56. The Governing Body may, with the sanction of a Meeting of the Life Donors and of the President of the Conference, add to or alter this scheme. But no alterations shall be made so as to affect the provisions of Clause 2 hereof as to the religious teaching of the School, or to the provisions of Clause 55 as to consents to leases or sales, or the provisions of Clause 57 as to the application of Property in the event of the abandonment of the School.

57. The Governing Body may, with the sanction of a Meeting of Life Donors and of the President of the Conference, give up the School. If they do so, the Property or the proceeds of sale thereof shall be devoted to such Educational purposes in connection with the Wesleyan-Methodist Body as the Governing Body, with the consent of a Meeting of Life Donors and of the President of the Conference, may direct; and either by way of founding or aiding any other institution, and either by way of payment or appropriation of corpus or capital, or by way of investment and application of income.

THE PASTORAL OVERSIGHT OF THE YOUNG, AND THEIR RELATION TO THE CHURCH.

ABSTRACT OF THE REPORT OF A COMMITTEE PRESENTED TO AND ADOPTED BY THE CONFERENCE IN SHEFFIELD, AND PRINTED BY ITS DIRECTION.

THE Committee was appointed by the Conference in 1874, (See Minutes, 1874, p. 454 of this Volume,) and met in London on Friday, June 4th, 1875.

READ :--1. A Digest of Resolutions adopted by the District Committees in May, 1874, in reference to the Report of a Committee appointed by the Conference of 1872 to consider "the Pastoral Oversight of the Young, and their relation to the Church." 2. More general Resolutions bearing upon the subject, adopted by the Second London, Portsmouth, Halifax and Bradford, Leeds, and Hull District Meetings. 3. A series of Resolutions submitted by the Rev. S. H. Tindall to the Meeting of the Second London District Committee, 1874.

Having considered the several Sections and Clauses of the Report in connection with the remarks and recommendations thereon by the District Committees, the Committee resolved to report as follows :—

I.-PARENTAL OBLIGATIONS.

1. The Committee desire, in the first place, to express their conviction that it is of the highest importance that Christian parents entertain a due sense of their obligation to bring their children to Christian baptism, to instruct them and the young people of their families in Christian truth, to encourage them to early consecration and saving faith in Christ, and to train and influence them rightly. The Committee consider that no Church arrangements can relieve parents of these duties ; and, that the best endeavours of Ministers and others, and the most skilfullydevised organization, will be likely to prove ineffective, if parental responsibilities are not distinctly recognised and faithfully discharged.

2. In the opinion of the Committee special attention ought to be given by Methodist parents to such duties connected with the oversight of their families as the following :- The regular and devout observance of family worship; the continual maintenance of a firm, kind, and wise discipline in the government of the family; catechetical instruction in the family; a judicious control of the companionships which their sons and daughters form; the selection of suitable schools; the provision of literature for family reading, which, while attractive and instructive, is also pure and likely to promote earnest piety and intelligent sympathy with Methodism; watchful endeavours to exclude from their homes injurious literature; guarding against doubtful recreations and amuscments; the creation of such happy home influences as may tend to prevent cravings for dissipation, and to nourish family ties and affections; special care in placing children in godly homes when learning a business.

3. The Committee believe that not only should such parental obligations and duties as have been named be enforced in the course of pastoral preaching, but that they may with advantage be more explicitly pressed upon the attention of Methodist parents in meetings of the Society

11.-CHILDREN'S MEETINGS: CONDUCTED BY MINISTERS.

On this subject the Committee resolved as follows :---

1. That the Conference be recommended to reprint the Resolution of 1838, modified by the insertion of the words, "wherever practicable," so as to read as follows :—"The Preachers are solemnly enjoined to hold, wherever practicable, regular weekly meetings with the children of our people, under the age of fourteen, on the most convenient day of the week, in every town where a Preacher has his stated residence, according to our ancient rule and practice."

2. That the Conference be requested to direct that inquiry be made in Ministers' Meetings and in the May District Meetings respecting the observance of this regulation, in connection with the question inserted in the Schedules sent by the President to Superintendents.

3. The Committee also recognise the great importance of paying continued and increased attention to such young persons connected with our Congregations and Societies as are fourteen years of age and upwards, and recommend that, wherever practicable, meetings be held for the instruction of such young persons in the facts and doctrines of Holy Scripture.

III.-SOCIETY-CLASSES FOR YOUNG PEOPLE.

The Committee are of opinion that it is extremely desirable that Superintendent Ministers should give special attention to the selection of suitable persons—Sunday-school Teachers and others—for nomination as Leaders of Society-classes, with a view to the gathering of members from among Sunday-scholars and others; and that such Society-classes should be so conducted as to suit the wants and capacities of young people.

IV.

The Committee, having considered a proposal (contained in the Report of the Committee of 1872) respecting the admission of Catechumens, as such, into Society-classes; and also the series of Resolutions submitted by the Rev. S. H. Tindall, which provided (*inter alia*) for the admission, under prescribed regulations and conditions, of our baptized young people to the Lord's Supper,—resolved as follows :—

The Committee find that there is a considerable preponderance of opinion in the Districts of the Connexion against the admission of Catechumens, as such, into Society-classes: and although they consider it highly desirable that more careful attention should be given by Ministers to the children of our people, especially in view of the privileges and obligations which result from their baptism, the Committee do not recommend the Conference to proceed to any new legislation on this subject at present.
