MINUTES OF THE  
FIRST MEETING OF THE SOUTHERN CONFERENCE  
OF THE UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST, INC.

SEPTEMBER 30, 1965

The first meeting of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Incorporated, was held September 30, 1965, in Whitley Memorial Auditorium, Elon College, North Carolina. The meeting was called to order by Dr. William T. Scott, Chairman of the Interim Board of the Conference, at 9:50 o'clock A.M., with the following statement:

"Pursuant to a joint letter missive dated August 10, 1965, from the Southern Synod — Banks J. Peeler; Convention of the South — J. Taylor Stanley; Southern Convention — Clyde L. Fields, addressed to each Church and each Minister as provided under **Condition II**, Page 7, Constitution; and pursuant to action of the Interim Board of Directors — **Condition III**, Page 7, Constitution; this first meeting of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ is CALLED TO ORDER.

"We gather in what is perhaps the most unusual meeting of our entire fellowship, certainly in the South. We gather here across former denominational lines and across racial lines. Here assembled, we represent a NEW CONFERENCE aborning — uniting the former Southern Synod of the Evangelical and Reformed Church with 70 Churches and 16,558 members; the Convention of the South of Congregational Christian Churches, of North Carolina and Virginia with 158 Churches and 16,984 members; and the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches with 186 Churches and 33,613 members in North Carolina and Southern Virginia. We form the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ with 414 Churches and 66,155 members.

"We meet as children of God; as followers of Jesus Christ. In Him we can find adequate answers to all questions. In Him we can unite our hearts and hands to do His will as Christian brethren. As our first act in invoking God's blessings upon this meeting, let us unite our voices in singing the great hymn, 'God of Grace and God of Glory.'"

The Rev. Dr. Lonnie A. Carpenter, of Salisbury, North Carolina, led devotions by reading from the 2nd Chapter of Philippians of the New Testament, Verses 1 through 18. Rev. Joshua L. Levens, Winston-Salem, North Carolina, Registrar, was recognized, and he reported that 176 ministers, 181 lay delegates and 70 visitors had registered to the hour; and it was thereupon declared, by Chairman Scott, that a quorum was present. Registrar Levens later reported that 198 ministers, 248 lay delegates, and 110 visitors had registered for the Conference.

Chairman Scott then announced that all official delegates would be seated on the main floor of the Auditorium, and should display their badge as such; that all visitors and non-delegates should be seated in the balcony of the Auditorium. The Chairman also stated that Dr. J. Earl Danieley, Elon College, North Carolina, had been chosen as parliamentarian for this meeting.

Dr. Clyde L. Fields was recognized and made the following announcement of legal status of this Conference which had been received from Hon. Thad Eure, Secretary of State of the State of North Carolina:

The articles of consolidation and merger for the church conferences are effective when they are filed in the Office of the Secretary of State and they were filed at 9 o'clock this morning. Effective at 9 o'clock, September 30, 1965, the name became The Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Incorporated.

Thereupon, Dr. Scott duly declared the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Incorporated, as being in legal session.

Rev. Roy E. Leinbach, Jr., Secretary of the Business Committee of the Interim Board of Directors, presented a resolution from this Committee. The following action was thereupon taken:

**Voted 1 SC, Inc. '65**

That the following persons serve as **officers** for a term to expire at the conclusion of the meeting of the Conference in the Spring of 1967; or until their successors are elected:

**Voted 2 SC, Inc. '65**

That we use the following rules of procedure for this meeting:

1. Procedures shall follow Robert's Rules of Order Revised. (Constitution IX-3)
2. The interim Board of Directors. . . "Shall determine the time and place and the order of business of the first meeting of the Conference, at which each item of business shall be referred to the said Board of Directors who are authorized to determine the time and form in which it shall be presented to the Conference, provided, however, that the Conference may at its pleasure consider and act upon any item of business, either suppressed or altered by the Board of Directors acting in the capacity of Business Committee at the first meeting." (Condition III)
3. The voting delegates of the Conference shall consist of the ordained ministers holding standing in the Associations of the Conference or in the

Conference itself, and who reside within geographical boundaries of the Southern Conference; one lay delegate from each local church within the geographical boundaries of the Southern Conference (excepting those local churches with memberships of more than three hundred, who shall be entitled to one voting delegate for each additional three hundred members or major fraction thereof).

4. Members of the Board of Directors shall be voting members of the Conference.
5. Visitors may by vote of the Conference be admitted to the privilege of the floor as honorary members but shall not have the right to vote.
6. Matters deemed by the Chairman to be merely formal, routine and non-controversial may be disposed of by common consent. If there is objection, however, the chair will await a formal motion and submit the question to debate and vote. (Robert, P. 25)
7. Delegates may be required to state their names when they are recognized, and to submit main motions, amendments and instructions to a committee in writing before the same are submitted to vote. Except when rising to a point of order or to second a motion, delegates should take places at one of the microphones. (Robert, P. 27, 34)
8. Not more than one amendment to an amendment will be considered at the same time. (Robert, P. 135)
9. To close debate the proper motion is "I move the previous question" or "I move to close debate and proceed to vote on the pending question." The mover must gain recognition and the motion requires a second. The motion cannot be amended or debated and requires a  $\frac{2}{3}$  vote for adoption. It will not suffice merely to call "Question" if there are still delegates who wish to be heard in debate. (Robert, P. 111)
10. The chairman is charged with the duty of providing a fair and orderly disposition of the business of the Conference. Any ruling of the chair may be appealed by a delegate. An appeal requires a second. A majority vote of the delegates upon the appeal will prevail. (Robert, P. 79, 81)
11. Nominations, whether made by the Nominating Committee or from the floor, need not be seconded. (Robert, P. 263)
12. No speaker shall speak to the same issue more than twice except to answer questions addressed to him from the floor. A maximum of five minutes is allotted to the first speech by any speaker and two minutes to his second speech. Leave to extend the time further shall require a  $\frac{2}{3}$  vote, without debate, unless granted by common consent.
13. No delegate shall make a nomination from the floor until he has first secured the consent of his nominee.

President Melvin Palmer thereupon assumed the chair and received the gavel from Dr. Scott. President Palmer expressed his appreciation to all assembled and stated that we were "here today to give life to the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Incorporated." Dr. J. Earl Danieleley, President of Elon College, brought greetings and expressed pleasure to the delegates for having selected the Elon College campus for this initial historic meeting. Appropriate response was made by Mrs. Henry Kennedy, Jr. of Thomasville, North Carolina.

Among visitors recognized were: Dr. Samuel Wiley, Executive Secretary of the North Carolina Council of Churches; Superintendent Charles Beidler of the Nazareth Children's Home; Superintendent Walstein W. Snyder of the Elon Home for Children; Dr. Donald Dearborn, President of Catawba College, and Dr. Banks J. Peeler, Rev. J. Taylor Stanley, and Rev. Joe A. Franch, former Presidents of the separate judicatories.

Rev. Roy Leinbach then moved the adoption of the printed program as amended, and the following action was taken:

**Voted 3 SC, Inc. '65**

That the printed program captioned "First Session The Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Inc., Thursday, September 30, 1965, Whitley Memorial Auditorium, Elon College, North Carolina," as amended to reflect special music by the Elon College Singers as immediately following the report of the Business Committee, be received and adopted as the program for the First Session of this Conference.

Following this, Rev. W. Judson King, Vice-President, assumed the chair while President Palmer made a report on matters considered by the Steering Committee. After some discussion, the following action was taken:

**Voted 4 SC, Inc. '65**

That the initial salary range for the Conference Associate Ministers be from \$5,500.00 to \$7,000.00 and that the salary range for the Conference Minister be from \$7,500.00 to \$9,000.00; that this Conference initially employ a staff of a Conference Minister, Conference Field Associate, and three Area Administrators, and that the office personnel of the Southern Conference initially be made up of a Secretary to the Conference Minister and an Assistant Treasurer-Bookkeeper; that the Board of Directors of the Southern Conference determine and fix the functions and duties of the Conference Minister, Conference Field Associate, Area Administrators, Secretary to the Conference Minister and Assistant Treasurer-Bookkeeper, and that a job analysis therefore be prepared, all in keeping with the Constitution and By-Laws of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ

**Voted 5 SC, Inc. '65**

That the office of Director of Christian Education be guaranteed by a vote of the Conference, and that neither the office nor the salary be discontinued for any reason except by a future vote of the entire assembled Conference.

**Voted 6 SC, Inc. '65**

That the Board of Directors of the Southern Conference choose one member of the Southern Conference staff to have specialized responsibility working in the area of Church Extension with the Conference Coordinator — preferably the Conference Minister to be so chosen.

**Voted 7 SC, Inc. '65**

That the North Carolina Church Builders Club of the Southern Convention, the Church Builders Club of the Southern Synod, the Christian Missionary

Association of the Eastern Virginia Conference, and any other organization with similar purpose be requested to merge as soon as possible and become an integral part of the responsibility of the Committee on Church Extension of the Southern Conference.

It was agreed that the reports from the Consolidating Corporations would be considered at this time, and Dr. Clyde Fields stated to the delegates that copies of the Inventory of Assets and Liabilities of said Consolidating Corporations were in the hands of each of the delegates. The Inventory of Assets and Liabilities of the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, Inc., consisting of eight pages, the Statement of Assets and Liabilities of the Southern Synod, Evangelical and Reformed Church, Inc., consisting of three pages and the Inventory of the Convention of the South, consisting of one page, are included as a part of these Minutes and are attached as Appendices A, B, and C, respectively.

**Voted 8 SC, Inc. '65**

That the Inventories of the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, Inc., the Southern Synod, Evangelical and Reformed Church, Inc. and the Convention of the South be accepted and delivered to the Board of Directors.

Dr. Fields then read the Proposed Interim Provision for Transition of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Inc., for the period September 30-December 31, 1965, which is attached to these Minutes as Appendix D, and the following action was taken:

**Voted 9 SC, Inc. '65**

That the three-page document captioned "Proposed Interim Provision for Transition of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Inc. for the period September 30 - December 31, 1965," be received and accepted.

Mr. William W. Greenland, Chairman of the Budget Committee, Salisbury, North Carolina, presented the first reading of the report of his Committee. Dr. J. Earl Danieleley, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, made the following report of the Nominating Committee:

The following nominations from the floor were made: For Conference Committee on Lay Life and Work — Rev. Donald Leonard, Rev. Ronald Morris, and Rev. W. E. Wisseman; for Board of Directors of Virginia Area for one year term as laymen — Mrs. Robert Bew; for Board of Directors, Virginia area, for one year term as Minister — Rev. John Lackey; for Board of Directors, Virginia Area for two year term as laymen — Mrs. Garland Spratley.

The Chairman of the Nominating Committee thereupon submitted the following nominees for staff positions by his Committee: Conference Minister — James H. Lightbourne, Jr.; Conference Field Associate — James W. Morrison; Eastern Virginia Area Administrator — L. Bill Simmons; Eastern North Carolina Area Administrator — Clyde L. Fields; Western North Carolina Area Administrator — Edwin M. Aleorn; and Director of Christian Education — Richard N. Rinker.

Following this nomination, and after an opportunity for nominations from the floor, the following action was taken:

**Voted 10 SC, Inc. '65**

That the nominations be closed and that the names submitted and printed on the report of the Nominating Committee, along with the staff nominations by the Nominating Committee and the nominations from the floor, be officially placed in nomination.

Rev. Robert Marr, Chairman of the Elections Committee, conducted the distribution of the ballots along with members of his Committee.

Mr. W. H. Baker, Conference Coordinator of Stewardship and O.C.W.M., then made a report on behalf of his Committee and recommended that the Southern Conference adopt "The Stairway of Progress Plan for O.C.W.M. Goals." By this plan, the first step is 10% of local expenses and then moves upward by steps representing 5% of local expenses. The top of the Stairway of Progress is the Ideal Goal — as much for others as for ourselves, dollar for dollar. As a church reaches its new step level, its next goal is automatically just ahead of it. The following action was taken:

**Voted 11 SC, Inc. '65**

That the report of the Committee on Stewardship and O.C.W.M. be received and adopted and that The Stairway of Progress plan for O.C.W.M. be likewise received and adopted.

Rev. Carl E. Wallace, Chairman of the World Ministries Committee, thereupon made his report to the Conference. Rev. Harold Myers, Chairman of the Church Extension Committee, also made his report to the Conference. Rev. George A. Fidler, Chairman of the Christian Social Action Committee, also made his report to the Conference. Rev. Lawrence A. Leonard, Chairman of the Health and Welfare Committee, also made his report to the Conference. The following action was taken in connection with Mr. Leonard's report:

**Voted 12 SC, Inc. '65**

That each local church of the Conference establish a Committee on Health and Welfare Services and charge the Committee with the responsibility for securing information on all Health and Welfare Agencies and Services available to the citizens of their community and through our Conference and the United Church of Christ.

Rev. Richard N. Rinker, Chairman of the Christian Education Committee, made his report to the Conference and the following action was taken after a motion was favorably passed that the report be received:

**Voted 13 SC, Inc. '65**

That the report of the Christian Education Coordinator, Rev. Richard N. Rinker, as amended by the deletion of the words, "without racial restrictions"

as shown in paragraph 3 under Recommendations, be hereby adopted. Appendix E.

Rev. W. J. Andes, Chairman of Church and Ministry Committee, thereafter made his report to the Conference. Dr. W. T. Scott, Chairman of the Historical Committee, thereupon made his report to the Conference and the following action was taken:

**Voted 14 SC, Inc. '65**

That the report of the Historical Coordinator be adopted and that it be referred to the Board of Directors for implementation.

Dr. Clyde L. Fields, Chairman of the Collegiate Staff, made the report of the Collegiate Staff to the Conference for the period November 18, 1964, through September 30, 1965. A standing vote of profound appreciation was extended to Rev. Taylor Stanley, Dr. Banks Peeler, and Dr. Clyde L. Fields, for their effort through the period.

Chairman Greenland of the Budget Committee presented the final reading of his committee's report, which is made a part of these Minutes and attached hereto as Appendix F. The following action was thereupon taken:

**Voted 15 SC, Inc. '65**

That the proposed budget of the Budget Committee, as amended, reflecting a total 1966 O.C.W.M. budget goal of \$410,225.00, which includes an additional \$10,225.00 under Personnel, be, and the same is hereby received and adopted.

Certain recommendations were made by the Nominating Committee, and the following action was taken:

**Voted 16 SC, Inc. '65**

That the Board of Directors is hereby directed to appoint members of Conference Committees which may be needed in the interim until the next meeting of the Conference.

**Voted 17 SC, Inc. '65**

That the Board of Directors serve as a Committee on Constitution and By-Laws for the next meeting of the Conference and that said Board propose an Amendment to Article 6 of the By-Laws to provide a system for the selection of Conference Committees.

The following action was taken with regard to the date and place for the Spring Session of the Conference:

**Voted 18 SC, Inc. '65**

That the Board of Directors be hereby empowered to choose the time and place of the 1966 Session of the Southern Conference.

Rev. George Gay, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, presented the report of his Committee to the Conference. The following action was taken with regard to the report of the Resolutions Committee:

**Voted 19 SC, Inc. '65**

That the report of the Resolutions Committee be hereby received and adopted by this Conference. Appendix G.

Following a prayer by Rev. J. Taylor Stanley, Dr. W. T. Scott introduced Dr. Truman B. Douglass, Executive Vice-President of the Board for Homeland Ministries of the United Church of Christ, who addressed the Conference with an inspiring and meaningful speech on the thesis of "Who Owns the Church?"

The Elections Committee, Rev. Robert Marr, Chairman, reported that the following were duly elected to the Board of Directors for the office, the term and the area set opposite their respective names:

**C. Virginia Field Secretary's Parsonage, 108 Gibson Dr., Chesapeake, Va.**

Parsonage located at 213 Charlotte Dr., Portsmouth, Va., which had served as a parsonage for the Stewardship and Evangelism Secretary, was sold and the equity used to purchase an eight-room combination house and office, together with lot 52 as shown on the plat of Red Oak Colony, Section 3 duly recorded in the Office of Clerk of Circuit Court of the City of Chesapeake, Va., in Book 42, page 19, and such property purchased and conveyed to the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches in a deed from Warren G. Gibson and wife, dated February 1, 1963.
2. The house is brick veneered and siding combination, split-level, having eight rooms with a combination office.

3. Deed of trust is held by Portsmouth and Norfolk County Savings and Loan Association, in the amount of \$17,500, such deed of trust made April 22, 1963. The loan was for fifteen years at 6% interest.

## II. INSTITUTIONS

### A. **Elon College**

1. Elon College is church related and was founded by the Christian Church in 1889. Dr. J. Earl Danieleley is President. The College is located in the town of Elon College, N. C.
2. Elon College is incorporated under the laws of North Carolina for the purpose of providing Christian training and instruction in the field of higher education.
3. Elon College is operated under the provisions of its charter and managed by a Board of Trustees.
4. The Southern Convention has provided \$35,000 annually in regular budget support to Elon College.

### B. **Elon Home for Children ....**

1. Elon Home for Children was founded in 1907 by the Christian Church. Dr. W. W. Snyder is Superintendent. It is located in the town of Elon College, N. C.
2. Elon Home for Children is incorporated under the laws of the State of North Carolina and operates under its charter and is managed by a Board of Trustees.
3. The Southern Convention has provided \$25,000 annually in regular budget support to the Elon Home for Children.

### C. **Moonelon Conference Center**

1. Moonelon Conference Center, comprising some 20 acres of land and buildings, is located two miles west of Elon College, N. C., on highway No. 100. The property was given to the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches in 1951, by Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Sellers of Burlington, N. C.
2. The Board of Christian Education of the Southern Convention has been given priority for the use of Moonelon Conference Center in the Camp and Conference program planned by the Board. Other uses of Moonelon Conference Center have been determined by the Board of Managers.
3. Members of the Board of Managers are elected by the Southern Convention.

4. The Southern Convention provides budget support for the operation and maintenance of Moonelon Conference Center in the amount of \$850.00 for maintenance and \$1,750.00 for a part-time resident manager on an annual basis.
5. Moonelon Conference Center is chartered by the State of North Carolina, and operates according to its charter.
6. The Churchmen's Fellowship, the Women's Fellowship, and the Pilgrim Fellowship of the Southern Convention have taken on major projects for improvement and program of Mooneion Conference Center.

#### D. The Mission Board

1. The Mission Board of the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, Inc., was chartered September 28, 1912, under the laws of North Carolina. The charter has been amended on several occasions.
2. Principal office of The Mission Board is at Elon College, N. C., and the agent is Dr. Clyde L. Fields.
3. The Mission Board is managed by members or directors who are elected by the Southern Convention.
4. The Mission Board has acted as the church extension arm of the Southern Convention, and for many years was the mission arm of the Southern Convention in the work of home and foreign missions.
5. The Mission Board operates under the provisions of its charter.

### III. DESIGNATED FUNDS

#### A. Ministerial Scholarship Fund — \$4,000.00

The assets of the Ministerial Scholarship Fund in the amount of \$4,000.00 are hereby transferred to the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Inc., for the purpose of helping to provide Ministerial Scholarship assistance to ministerial students from the churches of the Southern Conference who do not meet the criteria of aid from the Council for Church and Ministry of the United Church of Christ. (It is understood that the bulk of Ministerial Scholarship will be from the Council for Church and Ministry of the United Church of Christ.)

It is hereby recommended:

1. That the above named funds be under the control of the Board of Directors of the Southern Conference and expended on recommendation of the Committee on Church and Ministry of the Southern Conference.
2. That the Committee on Church and Ministry require applicants for these funds to fill out proper application and note forms before endorsing applicants for aid.
3. That the Southern Conference be challenged to add to these funds and give consideration to making this a permanent fund with the interest from same to be expended for scholarship aid.

All this is predicated on the fact that the need for ministers and ministerial scholarship aid is of a growing concern to all.

**B. Campus Ministry Fund — \$5,024.00**

The assets of the Southern Convention Campus Ministry Fund in the amount of \$5,024.00, on deposit with Community Federal Savings and Loan, Burlington, N. C. (savings account No. 15326), are hereby transferred to the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Inc.

These funds were provided by the Women's Fellowship of the Southern Convention and are designated for Campus Ministry work in North Carolina and Virginia.

These funds are under the control of the Board of Directors of the Southern Conference and are to be withdrawn on authorization of the Committee on Higher Education of the Southern Conference, which has responsibility for Campus Ministry work in the Southern Conference.

**C. O'Kelly Memorial Fund — \$1,161.64**

Savings account No. 17008, in amount of \$1,161.64, deposited with Community Federal Savings and Loan Association, Burlington, N. C., is designated funds of the O'Kelly Memorial Fund, for the purposes of maintaining the O'Kelly Cemetery and O'Kelly Christian Church as shrines of the Southern Convention.

This designated fund is transferred to the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Inc., under the direction of the Board of Directors, and disbursement of funds will be upon the authorization of the Elon College Historical Sub-Committee of the Historical Committee of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Inc. In the event these funds are not accepted under these conditions by the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Inc., these funds will then be transferred to Elon College for the purpose as stated above.

**Information:**

The Historical Society of the Southern Convention was organized on February 14, 1956, by action of the Executive Board in order to provide for a Church History Room at Elon College and continue the work of the O'Kelly Memorial Foundation. A Board of Directors of twelve persons was elected to carry this double responsibility. Elon College and the Southern Convention have shared in the salary of a part-time Curator of the Church History Room. The O'Kelly Memorial Funds have been managed as designated funds by the Historical Society for the purpose of maintaining the O'Kelly Cemetery and the O'Kelly Chapel Christian Church as shrines of Southern Convention history.

**D. Southern Convention Group Insurance Funds — \$9,000.38**

**Assets:**

The checking account assets and savings account No. 13413, on deposit with Community Federal Savings and Loan Association, Burlington, N. C., of the Group Insurance Plan of the Southern Convention, shall be transferred to the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ under the following conditions:

1. The cash assets are the property of the members of the Southern Convention Group Insurance Plan, and the withdrawal of funds shall be upon authorization of the Trustees of the Group Insurance Plan of the Southern Convention.

2. The Southern Convention Group Insurance Plan provides for term life insurance for members in a contract with Presbyterian Minister's Fund. The Trustees and members of the Plan, with the counsel of the Board of Directors of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Inc., will need to determine the future of the term life insurance contract held with Presbyterian Minister's Fund.

In the event the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Inc., does not accept the assets of the Group Insurance Plan of the Southern Convention under the above named conditions, the assets shall be determined by the Trustees of the Group Insurance Plan.

(See Southern Convention minutes EC-EB'65-14.)

#### **Information:**

The Group Insurance Plan of the Southern Convention was organized in 1951 to provide a plan whereby full-time licensed or Ordained pastors of the Southern Convention would be provided with hospital and group term life insurance coverage, to be administered by a Board of Trustees of 12 members. Dr. W. T. Scott, Sr., Elon College, N. C., is Chairman of the Trustees. The assets are and have been the property of the members of the Southern Convention Group Insurance Plan.

The hospital coverage of the Group Insurance Plan formerly carried with Ministers' Life and Casualty Union will be transferred to the plan provided by Hospital Savings Association as of October 1, 1965. The Southern Synod has adopted a similar plan with the same carrier. It is understood that these two plans will become one plan for the Southern Conference. It is understood that the Convention of the South has no plan, but ministers will be eligible for coverage in the Southern Conference plan.

The former Southern Convention Acting Associations will pay alternate premium costs on a quarterly basis for 1966 for members of the Southern Convention Plan.

The Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Inc., through the Board of Directors, should seek a uniform premium payment plan for the hospital insurance program of the Southern Conference to take effect as early as possible.

#### **E. Christian Sun Endowment Fund -- \$1,513.51**

##### **Assets:**

Savings account No. 7769, Community Federal Savings & Loan Association, Burlington, North Carolina.

These funds are to be transferred to the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Inc., and designated "Christian Sun Endowment Fund," and shall be permanent funds, with the interest same to be used for the publication costs of the Southern Conference News, or the name of the official journal of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Inc.

#### **Information:**

##### **1. THE CHRISTIAN SUN.**

THE CHRISTIAN SUN has been published by the Southern Convention since 1844, and supported by subscriptions and apportionment from the Southern Convention. THE CHRISTIAN SUN will be merged with the NEWS-LETTER and THE STANDARD, to become a publication of the Southern Conference.

## 2. THE CHRISTIAN ANNUAL

The minutes of the Southern Convention have been published in THE CHRISTIAN ANNUAL since the middle of the nineteenth century. THE ANNUAL has contained the minutes of the Southern Convention and the several Conferences which have been a part of same, and the cost of THE ANNUAL has been borne by the several Conferences from funds channeled through the Board of Publications for payment of THE CHRISTIAN ANNUAL printing cost.

## A Statement of Assets and Liabilities

- I. **The Synod** The Synod is composed of 71 congregations, all located in North Carolina. Of these 9 are yoked parishes of two congregations each. There are sixty-two single church parishes. Confirmed membership is 16,667, and a Sunday School enrollment of 15,237 pupils.

There are 80 ministers on the roll and in good standing. Ten have retired status; four are serving as chaplains in the Military Services of the U.S.A.; ten are engaged in teaching on college and university level. One is a missionary to China.

- II. **Property** The Synod owns or controls the following property:

- a. **A house and lot at 204 Lantz Ave., Salisbury, N. C.** The house was built in 1936, and provides quarters for synod offices, and living space for the Synod President. The property is valued at \$50,000.

The camp is managed by a Board of 9 trustees elected by the Synod, 3 each year. Part-time care-taker is paid by the trustees from income of the camp.

- c. **Two Church properties**

1. Old St. Paul's Church and cemetery, Newton, N. C., Route 1, owned jointly by the Southern Synod and N. C. Lutheran Synod.
2. Mt. Bethel (Little White) Church, Blowing Rock, N. C., one acre of land, a small frame building and cemetery. There is no congregation but the synod maintains the property for summer time conference use.

### III. Corporations

- a. **Catawba College, Inc.**, Salisbury, North Carolina, is located on 190 acres of land, housed in 25 buildings, with a student enrollment capacity of 900 persons.

### **EXHIBIT D**

PROPOSED INTERIM PROVISION FOR TRANSITION  
of  
THE SOUTHERN CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED CHURCH  
OF CHRIST, INC.

For the Period September 30 — December 31, 1965

It is hereby recommended to the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Inc., that the following Interim Provision for Transition be approved:

In order that there may be no interruption or delay of the work of the Southern Synod, Convention of the South, and the Southern Convention in the transition from these former organizations to the Southern Conference, the current operations, including employment of personnel, meetings and financing for the remainder of the calendar year September 30 — December 31, 1965, shall continue to be conducted under existing constitutions and by-laws of the constituent corporations, so far as may be practicable and always subject to the Board of Directors.

Planning, employment of personnel, budgeting, financing, and other activities projected into the future beyond January 1, 1966, shall be conducted under the new constitution and by-laws of the Southern Conference, and the Board of Directors of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Inc.

1. The employed staff of the three corporations will continue the same general duties under direction of the Southern Conference and the Board of Directors until January 1, 1966.
2. The present Treasurers of the three corporations shall be continued as receiving and disbursing treasurers until January 1, 1966, making periodic reports to the Southern Conference Treasurer and the Board of Directors. Salaries and other financial obligations in respective budgets will be paid by the three treasurers through December 31, 1965.
3. Cash assets of an unrestricted nature will be turned over to the Southern Conference Treasurer on or about January 1, 1966, by the three Treasurers. An audit will be made of the records of the three Treasurers and made available to the Southern Conference Board of Directors as soon as possible after the books are closed for receipts for 1965. This usually is done after January 10th.
4. Each corporation will turn over to the Southern Conference all restricted, designated, or otherwise limited funds, titles, property, etc., by January 1, 1966. All restricted or designated funds and all restricted property assets received from the three corporations will be honored by the Southern Conference.
5. The Mission Board of the Southern Convention will continue its subsidy for Church Extension projects to December 31, 1965. The Southern Conference will assume all subsidy for Church Extension after January 1, 1966.
6. Present staff and office personnel of the three corporations will assist in sending out and collecting the Annual Church Report Blanks from local churches. The reports will be mailed out in December. United Church of Christ Year Book report normally is completed by March 1st. The assistance of staff and office personnel of the three corporations should be utilized as much as possible in this enormous task.
7. Financial goals for local churches of the Southern Conference have been determined and distributed to churches prior to September 30th, utilizing the Stairway of Progress plan. Copies of the Stairway of Progress and the Conference budget printed in attractive brochures have been made available to all churches.
8. An inventory of equipment and supplies of the three church bodies shall be made available to the Southern Conference by September 30, 1965. The

Board of Directors of the Southern Conference shall determine the disposition and use of same.

9. The Executive Boards of the three church bodies will give notice to end contracts with printers for publishing THE CHRISTIAN SUN, THE STANDARD, and THE NEWSLETTER as soon after September 30, 1965, as possible. The Board of Directors of the Southern Conference shall name a publications Advisory Committee of six members at its first meeting, which shall, with the approval of the Board of Directors, initiate the new Southern Conference publication by January 1, 1966, if possible.
10. The Mission Board of the Southern Convention shall transfer deeds or titles, held by said Board for church extension aided churches, to the Southern Conference. Such churches include: Trinity United Church of Christ, Garner, N. C.; Pembroke Manor United Church of Christ, Virginia Beach, Va.; Siler City United Church of Christ, Siler City, N. C.
11. The Mission Board of the Southern Convention is a chartered corporate body under the laws of North Carolina, and will continue supervision of trust funds under its charter provisions.
12. The Southern Conference shall prepare its own minutes and have printed same for 1966, which will include the financial tables compiled from Annual Church Reports and published in the United Church of Christ Year Book. The Southern Conference minutes could be printed soon after the annual meeting held in late April.
13. Financial goals for local churches for 1966 shall be printed in the Southern Conference minutes, with the request that each Acting Association would also make the goals known and available to churches of the Acting Associations.
14. The Southern Conference Board of Directors should provide a uniform plan for payment of premiums for ministers' group insurance for 1967, if possible. The present plans would prevail during 1966. (The Southern Conference would have obligation for its employees.)
15. The Board of Directors of the Southern Conference shall arrange for a modern and efficient bookkeeping system and equipment for the Conference Office.
16. The Board of Directors of the Southern Conference shall name a Headquarters Site Committee of six persons charged with the responsibility of renting headquarters office space in Burlington, North Carolina, as of January 1, 1966. (It is possible that the present office at Elon College could be continued after January 1, 1966, if desired and ample notice is given to Elon College.)
17. The Headquarters Site Committee shall, in consultation with the Conference Minister-elect, recommend the purchase or rental of a home for the Conference Minister in or near Burlington, N. C., as of January 1, 1966.
18. The Headquarters Site Committee shall, in consultation with the Associate Minister for Field Work, recommend a parsonage to be purchased or rented

for the use of the Associate Minister for Field Work. This parsonage shall be located at a place determined by the Board of Directors.

19. The Southern Synod parsonage at Salisbury shall be continued as the home of the Associate Minister for the Western North Carolina Area.
20. The Southern Convention parsonage at Norfolk, Virginia, shall be continued as the home of the Associate Minister for the Virginia Area.
21. The Southern Convention parsonage on Williamson Avenue in Elon College, N. C., shall be continued as the home of the Associate Minister for the Eastern North Carolina Area.
22. In the event the Southern Convention parsonage on East College Avenue in Elon College, North Carolina, will not be needed by the Southern Conference for the residence of a staff person, Elon College will have the first right of refusal for sale of same at a fair market value. The assets would be the property of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Inc.
23. Elon College has indicated a willingness to provide office space for the Associate Minister for the Eastern North Carolina Area.
24. Moving expenses for staff personnel shall be borne by the Southern Conference.
25. Present office personnel of the three corporations shall be given first preference for employment as office personnel of the Southern Conference by the Board of Directors of the Southern Conference.
26. Each of the church corporations shall publish their minutes for 1965, or any portion thereof. The Southern Convention Annual for 1965 will be printed and distributed to former Southern Convention Churches, and the cost of same will be borne by the Acting Associations of the former Southern Convention, as in former years.

The proposed Interim Provision for Transition has been approved by the Steering Committee of the Southern Conference and the Interim Board of Directors for the Southern Conference, and is hereby submitted to the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Inc., for approval and for implementation by the Southern Conference Board of Directors.

#### EXHIBIT E

#### RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE

1. That, under the leadership of a Christian Education Coordinator (who ought to be a professional on the staff full-time), the Christian Education Commission or Committee should be selected from among the members of the three Christian Education committees of the uniting judicatories who have been involved in previous planning and implementation of the educational program.

2. That budgetary provisions be made to provide for the continuing and increased work of the Christian Education Associates, whose past service is incalculable in their ministry to the local churches, and that the Christian Education Coordinator be responsible for their ongoing training and use.
3. That the present camp/conference sites be developed along the special lines for which they seem to be best adapted, e.g., John's River for camping; Moonelon Center for conference/retreats; Blowing Rock for retreats; Franklinton Center for conference/retreats; and that all such facilities be made available to all members of the Southern Conference sharing in their development and ministries.
4. That a particular effort be made in adult education and the youth ministry during the next year or two, striving for the time when information and methods represent contemporary standards and meet contemporary needs.

The Rev. Dr. Fred S. Buschmeyer, of New York City, Secretary of the United Church of Christ, addressed the delegates and visitors with a timely and meaningful message on the work of the United Church.

Mr. Walter L. Cooper, Treasurer, submitted the Treasurer's report.

**Voted 3 SC, Inc. '66**

That the Report of the Treasurer be accepted. (Appendix A)

In the absence of Mr. William W. Greenland, Coordinator of the Budget and Finance Committee, the Conference Minister, the Rev. James H. Lightbourne, Jr., submitted the report of that Committee.

**Voted 4 SC, Inc. '66**

That the Report of the Budget and Finance Committee be adopted. The motion passed with 175 votes in favor, and 118 against. (See Appendix B)

Mr. W. H. Baker, Coordinator of the Stewardship and O.C.W.M. Committee, submitted his Committee's report. Mr. Baker introduced the Rev. Clyde L. Fields, Associate Minister of the Eastern North Carolina Area, who spoke briefly on the report, as did the Rev. Karlton C. Johnson, of Atlanta, Georgia, who is Southern Regional Secretary for the Stewardship Council of the United Church of Christ. (Appendix C)

Thereafter, the Rev. Dr. Harold N. Skidmore, of New York City, Field Secretary for the Pension Boards of the United Church of Christ, addressed the delegates and visitors. He referred to several retirement plans and the need for increased attention to the care of clergymen in their retirement and annuities for their widows.

Mr. John D. Xanthos, Secretary, reported certain actions taken by the Board of Directors at prior meetings. (Appendix D)

**Voted 5 SC, Inc. '66**

That the following amendment to Article VI, Section 1, of the By-Laws, Paragraph 44-b, be approved:

"Each Conference Committee shall be composed of at least nine and not more than twelve members unless otherwise provided for in these By-Laws; equal numbers of members should be selected from each Administrative Area. Committee members shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected at the Annual Meeting of the Conference for a term beginning at the adjournment of the meeting at which they are elected and continuing through the next meeting or until their successors are elected."

At this time, the Chairman of registrations reported that the following had registered for this meeting: 214 lay delegates, 168 ministerial delegates, 94 visitors and 17 workers, making a total of 493 registered for the Annual Meeting. (Total attendance exceeded 600.)

The Rev. F. C. Lester, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, submitted the report of his Committee. The name of Mrs. Robert Bew, of Norfolk, Virginia was deleted from the list of nominees for the Christian Education Committee for the Southern Virginia Area and the name of Mrs. Lafayette

Wilkins, of Portsmouth, Virginia, was added in lieu thereof; the address of Rev. Carl T. Daye as shown on the list of nominations for the Worship Committee for the Southern Virginia Area was deleted and the correct address, Virginia Beach, Virginia, was added in lieu thereof. Nominations from the floor included the following: Clergy nominees for the former Southern Convention as General Synod delegates for 1967 were Rev. Daniel Jones, Reidsville, N. C., Rev. Robert Marr, Suffolk, Virginia, and Rev. John Lackey, Norfolk, Virginia. Lay nominee for the former Southern Synod was Mrs. Edwin Alcorn, Salisbury, N. C.

#### Voted 6 SC, Inc. '66

That General Synod Delegates for 1967 be voted by category as shown on the ballot.

The business meeting was recessed at 5:30 P.M., until 9:00 A.M. Wednesday morning, April 27, 1966.

The Conference Service of Worship was held at 8:00 P.M. The choir for the service was made up of members from the choirs of churches in the Virginia area under the direction of Mr. Eddie Finch, of Chesapeake, Va. The Rev. G. Melvin Palmer served as liturgist. The Rev. Dr. Fred S. Buschmeyer preached the sermon. The members of the staff of the Conference were installed as follows:

The Wednesday morning session was called to order at 9:00 A.M. by the President, and devotions were led by Rev. F. A. Hargett, of St. Stephens' Church, Greensboro, North Carolina.

Following the announcement of the election results, the Committee for Lay Life and Work presented a special program. Mrs. F. C. Lester, Secretary in the Southern Region, presided. After brief presentations by lay members of the Southern Conference, Mrs. Lester introduced Miss Helen Huntington Smith, Executive Secretary of the Council for Lay Life and Work of the

United Church of Christ. Miss Smith addressed the Conference on the work of the Council and the opportunities for effective Christian witness by dedicated lay members in the contemporary world.

The Rev. G. Harold Myers, Coordinator of the Committee on Church Extension, submitted the report of his Committee. The Report included a proposal for the establishment of the Church Builders Club of the Southern Conference.

**Voted 7 SC, Inc. '66**

That the Report of the Committee on Church Extension be adopted. (Appendix F)

The Rev. James H. Lightbourne, Jr., reported to the Conference on the life of the Conference during its first four months of full activity. In addition, the Conference Minister announced that the Rev. William J. Andes, Elon College, North Carolina, has been elected as Conference Minister of the Southeast Conference of the United Church of Christ, with headquarters in Atlanta, Georgia. The Rev. and Mrs. Andes were recognized by the Conference.

The Conference Minister then presented certificates of appreciation to the Executive Officers of the three judicatories which came together to form this Conference. Those receiving certificates were the Rev. J. Taylor Stanley, Superintendent of the Convention of the South; the Rev. Banks J. Peeler, D.D., President of the Southern Synod; and the Rev. Clyde L. Fields, D.D., Superintendent of the Southern Convention.

The following Committee reports were submitted and accepted by the delegates:

**Voted 8 SC, Inc. '66**

That the Report of the Christian Education Committee given by the Rev. Richard N. Rinker be accepted. (Appendix G)

**Voted 9 SC, Inc. '66**

That the Report of the Christian Social Action Committee given by the Rev. George Fidler be accepted. (Appendix H)

**Voted 10 SC, Inc. '66**

That the Report of the Committee for Church and Ministry given by the Rev. William J. Andes be accepted. (Appendix I)

**Voted 11 SC, Inc. '66**

That the Report of the Historical Committee, given by the Rev. W. T. Scott be accepted. (Appendix J)

**Voted 12 SC, Inc. '66**

That the Report of the Committee for Health and Welfare given by the Rev. Lawrence A. Leonard be accepted. (Appendix K)

The Report of the Committee for Lay Life and Work, Mrs. W. D. Gay, Chairman, and the Report of the Committee for World Ministries, Rev. Carl E. Wallace, Chairman, were presented for the information of the delegates and visitors and are a part of these minutes. (Appendix L and Appendix M)

The Conference Minister then presented two amendments to the Constitution of the United Church of Christ to be presented at the General Synod meeting in Chicago, which required action on the part of this Conference. He called for ratification on the same.

**Voted 13 SC, Inc. '66**

That paragraph 19 of the Constitution of the United Church of Christ be amended by adding the following:

“except that no ordained minister who has full standing in the United Church of Christ shall be ineligible to be a delegate to the General Council or to hold elective office in that body,” following the phrase, “nor shall any member of such a Church be a delegate to the General Synod or hold elective office in that body.”

**Voted 14 SC, Inc. '66**

That the following paragraph 77a be added to the Constitution of the United Church of Christ:

“77a The General Synod recognizes the United Church Foundation, Inc., as the instrumentality of the United Church of Christ to receive gifts from individuals and organizations, to hold such funds and property as may be entrusted or conveyed to it by the General Synod and other organizations and to administer, invest and reinvest the same and other funds in trust or otherwise.”

The Rev. Karlton C. Johnson, of Atlanta, Georgia, again spoke to the delegates regarding the Christian Enlistment materials and plans to be presented in the fall of 1966.

**Voted 15 SC, Inc. '66**

That the Board of Directors be hereby empowered to choose the time and place of the 1967 Annual Session of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Inc.

The Rev. Van D. Grimes, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, was presented. The following action was taken with regard to the report of the Resolutions Committee, which he presented:

**Voted 16 SC, Inc. '66**

That the report of the Resolutions Committee be hereby received and adopted by this Conference. (Appendix N)

There being no further business to come before this Session, it was duly declared adjourned sine die, with the benediction by President G. Melvin Palmer.

### (APPENDIX B)

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON BUDGET AND FINANCE

The Committee on Budget and Finance as appointed by the President of the Conference met at the Conference offices on March 23rd, 1966. Representing the denomination at this meeting were Dr. Harry Bredeweg of the General Synod Budget Committee and Rev. Karlton Johnson of the Stewardship Council.

The Stewardship Council requested that the Southern Conference increase its goal for General Synod giving by a substantial amount and, after much discussion, the committee agreed to request the Conference to increase its goal for 1967 to the extent of 5%. The figures:

1966 adopted goal .....	\$181,366
1967 suggested goal .....	\$190,434

Since it is too early in the life of the Conference to have gained a base of financial experience and since, therefore, the information available to the committee is no more concrete now than it was at the time of the preparation of the initial budget, the committee could not make intelligent changes in the Conference budget. The committee did, however, agree to bring to the attention

of the Conference the feeling of the Conference Minister, based on his close attention to the financial needs of the Conference, that \$11,100 additional would be needed to carry on the Conference program in a substantial manner in 1967. The figures:

1966 adopted goal .....	\$228,859
1967 suggested goal .....	\$240,000

#### (APPENDIX C)

#### REPORT OF THE STEWARDSHIP AND O.C.W.M. COMMITTEE

At the first meeting of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, September 30, 1965, at Elon College, North Carolina, the "Stairway of Progress Plan for Our Christian World Mission" was presented. The Conference voted to accept the plan by which 10% of the local expenses of each church would be the minimum amount each church would be asked to give, and that each church would be asked to move upward in its percentage giving until the Ideal Goal is reached—as much for others as for ourselves. It was pointed out that our churches would have to give at least 20% if we reached our budget requirement.

Your Committee wishes to report that all of the Acting Associations accepted the plan voted by the Conference. An attractive brochure was printed and distributed to all the churches in the Conference explaining the "Stairway of Progress." Churches were asked to accept apportionments of approximately the same amount as last year. Your Committee is very happy to report that a number of our churches accepted goals higher than 20%.

Much thought has been given to the working of the "Stairway of Progress," Stewardship and Our Christian World Mission during the year. Your Committee wishes to make the following recommendations:

1. That the Southern Conference make an effort to standardize home expense reporting, by inserting a supplementary information sheet in the Annual Report Forms sent out in December, 1966.
2. That the Nominating Committee present a slate of twelve (12) members for the Stewardship and O.C.W.M. Committee.
3. That each Administrative Area take seriously the matter of cultivating O.C.W.M. participation in its Area on a regular basis.
4. The Committee felt that dollar goal incentives should be provided by the Conference O.C.W.M. Committee, together with the "Stairway of Progress" Percentage Plan, that churches be challenged to move ahead on percentage O.C.W.M. giving, and that churches making progress should be given recognition. To stimulate giving to O.C.W.M., Area Meetings should be held throughout the Southern Conference.
5. The Committee strongly endorses the New Christian Enlistment Program, whereby the Stewardship Council and the O.C.W.M. Committee of the

Southern Conference would help the local churches in a program of stewardship promotion. The new plan is tailored to fit each local church. It is suggested that churches be asked to enroll and use every means to send representatives to special classes which will be held in each Administrative Area.

- 6 The Committee feels that there is a need to project schools for training consistorymen, deacons, trustees and church treasurers during the year 1967. Concern was felt for a program of information regarding Christian Wills and Family Budget Planning for young adults. The Christian Education Committee might be invited to participate for possible conferences at Blowing Rock and Franklinton Center.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH EXTENSION

The Committee on Church Extension of the Southern Conference held an organizational meeting in December, after the Board of Directors appointed twelve members representing the three administrative areas of the Conference to the Committee:

**Western N. C. Area:** Rev. Aubrey Hedrick, Rev. Frank Bostian, Mr. John Yeates, Mr. Marion B. Jones

**Eastern N. C. Area:** Rev. K. D. Register, Mr. D. Marsh McLelland, Mr. E. J. Austin, Rev. John P. Mangrum

**Southern Virginia Area:** Rev. Bill Simmons, Rev. Carroll Lewis, Mr. Ernest Waterfield, Rev. Joseph Copeland

It was announced that Dr. James Lightbourne, Conference Minister, would have the staff responsibility for Church Extension working through the area ministers.

The Committee defined its duties and structure along the following lines of activity and responsibility:

**NEW CHURCH DEVELOPMENT** — To study need, placement, and organization of new churches within the bounds of the Southern Conference working with local churches and Acting Associations and the UCBHM. To provide, with the help of the Board for Homeland Ministries, the necessary pastoral leadership and financial aid.

**TOWN AND COUNTRY** — To guide and assist Town and Country churches as they face the problems of change in their communities.

**URBAN CHURCH CONCERNS** — To provide needed ministries within the urban areas of our Conference bounds.

**NEW CHURCH AID FUND** — To raise funds through a Conference-wide membership that would make it possible for new missions to purchase land, parsonages, or help in construction of first unit.

As we entered into a new relationship with the Division of Church Extension of the Board for Homeland Ministries, it was understood that all new work would be given aid on the basis of 70% by the Division of Church Extension and 30% by the Southern Conference, looking forward to the time when it will be shared on a 50-50 basis.

The Mission Board of the former Southern Convention has met and already turned over many of the titles, deeds, and funds to the Southern Conference, and is seeking to go out of existence just as fast as its charter and bequest commitments can be satisfied.

In January (10-14), eleven of our mission pastors attended the SOUTHERN REGIONAL WORKERS' RETREAT for Mission pastors set up by the Division of Church Extension of the Board for Homeland Ministries. This is part of the in-service training for mission pastors to help them do a better job and keep them posted on new techniques and approaches.

The projects at present which are under the care of the Southern Conference and receiving aid jointly from the Conference and National Board are: Coronado Church, Norfolk, Va.; Pembroke Manor, Virginia Beach, Va.; Melville, Sedalia, N. C.; United C. C., Portsmouth, Va.; Parkway Church, Winston-Salem, N. C.; Trinity Church, Garner, N. C.; Church of the Master, Hickory, N. C.; Rodgers Park, Kannapolis, N. C.; St. Thomas, Winston-Salem, N. C.; St. Peter's, Greensboro, N. C.; First Church, Raleigh, N. C.; Moncure, Rockingham, N. C.

Projects receiving aid from Southern Conference only: Suffolk, Antioch, Siler City Mission, Siler City, N. C., and W.N.C. Pastor-At-Large.

A new mission will open in May in Southeast Charlotte with the Rev. E. Neff and wife to be leaders. A parsonage has been purchased and a meeting place in an elementary school nearby has been arranged. If you have any members living in that area of Charlotte, please forward the information to Mr. Neff.

The Church of the Master in Hickory, N. C., is rapidly completing its first unit and hopes to enter it by early fall.

Because of the fast growing areas in our Southern Conference and the need for wisdom in the selection of location and purchase of property as well as the best use of our funds, the Committee on Church Extension is working with the Board for Homeland Ministries in the hope that by another year we shall be able to have a professional study made of our Conference area to aid us in selection of sites, methods of starting new projects, and many other matters that will help us do a better job in initiating new work. Acting

Associations and local churches are urged to study their communities, seeking the counsel and guide of the staff in the Conference and your Committee, and endeavoring to start new churches where needed. A fine study guide has just been printed by the Division of Church Extension entitled **NEW CHURCH DEVELOPMENT GUIDEBOOK**, which will greatly aid any group thinking of a project in their community.

Following the instruction of the Southern Conference at its fall meeting in 1965, the Committee set about to study the Church Builders Clubs and other similar organizations that have been at work within the former three bodies. After much study, counsel of the former clubs and missionary association, the Committee would like to submit to the Southern Conference the following proposals for the establishment of the Church Builders Club of the Southern Conference:

1. The name of this organization shall be The Church Builders Club of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ.
2. The purpose of this organization shall be to provide funds for assistance in the construction of church facilities for new congregations in the Southern Conference.
3. The functions of the Church Builders Club shall be carried out by a subcommittee of the Church Extension Committee of the Southern Conference.

The Coordinator of the Conference Committee shall be the Chairman of the Church Builders Club Committee. In addition, the Committee shall be composed of three members — one from each Administrative Area of the Conference. They shall be members of the Conference Committee on Church Extension.

The designation of the funds received shall be made with the approval of the full Church Extension Committee.

4. There shall be one annual appeal for Church Builders Club memberships.
5. There shall be no set dues. Church members and organizations shall be encouraged to contribute in accordance with their means and interest.
6. The administrative costs shall be paid by the Conference.

The work of new church development is at the very heart of our ministry. We urge your continued interest, support, and assistance in every way to bring the church of our Lord Jesus Christ to the communities of our Conference.

The Youth Ministry: Rev. Robert Myers and Rev. Ronald Morris

The Adult Ministry: Mrs. Margie Cowan, Rev. St. Elmo Nauman, Jr. and Rev. Larry Fisher (ex officio representative from the Lay Life and Work Committee)

The Leadership Ministries: Mrs. Robert Bew, Rev. James Cress and Rev. Charles Samuels

The Specialized Ministries: Mrs. H. Winfred Bray and Rev. Wayne Fouts

**The second meeting** of this Committee was held at Durham on April 12. There shall be a **Christian Education Consultation** at Durham on May 12 for all Christian Education committee members of the former judicatory acting associations, church school conventions, CEA's and Rev. Walter E. Dobler of the Leadership Ministries staff of the national Division of Christian Education. The purposes for this Consultation will be discussion and examination of needs and patterns in the educational mission of The Southern Conference as the implications thereof for committees in the areas.

**The Children's Ministry** leaders met on February 12 to institute plans for the **1966 Vacation Church School Workshops**. During the week of April 17-24 there will be nine area workshops in North Carolina; in May there shall be two more in Southern Virginia. On March 26, training meetings for leaders of these workshops were held at Durham. Two of the Children's Ministry leaders attended the **Children's Workers Regional Conference** near Atlanta in March: Miss June Grubb and Miss Dorothy Ballinger. A second meeting of this Ministry was held at Greensboro on April 22 to discuss plans for possible demonstration classes in cooperation with an area school and a Conference demonstrations in the spring or summer of 1967.

**The Youth Ministry** will meet in May to discuss preliminary plans for the reorganization of the youth groups of the former judicatories into The Southern Conference Youth Fellowship. Authorization has also been given for a Church-related Vocations Retreat this year for high school students.

**The Adult Ministry** met on February 9 to plan for proposed, but since cancelled, adult leaders training sessions in May. Similar opportunities will be planned for a time later in the year or early next year.

**The Leadership Ministries** will meet during the Annual Conference meeting in April to begin working on Christian Education Associates revitalization. Following their meeting on February 9, Walter E. Dobler will be in Southern Virginia for an all-day session with CEA's.

**The Specialized Ministries** met on February 2 to plan for the **camps and conferences** within the Southern Conference in 1966. Materials used will be the same in all three places (Franklinton Center, Moonelon Center, and Johns River Valley). A total of sixteen camps and conferences will be held. Key leaders will attend training at Camp Glenkirk, Gainsville, Virginia, from May 2-6. They will then train representatives of the three camps at Moonelon

on May 28. These representatives will then train all staff members at the respective sites early in June.

**Recommendation:** That the above detailed planning and implementation of the Christian Education Committee of The Southern Conference for the educational mission of our Conference be approved and adopted by the Annual Conference in session.

#### (APPENDIX H)

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN SOCIAL ACTION

The Committee is still working with the old Committees of the three judicatories that now make up the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ. We are glad to announce that our staff resource person is Rev. James Morrison. The Committee has not met as a Committee since the Fall, due to limited funds; but the Coordinator has met with various members for specific purposes, and has met with the staff resource person from time to time. The Committee has sponsored a Social Action Workshop at Catawba College dealing with the question, "Is Socialism Inevitable?" Another Workshop is planned for Elon College on the theme, "How the Churches Deal With Communism." The Conference sent 15 delegates to Avon Park, Florida, for an Institute on problems of the day. Various Committee members have been involved in other problems, i.e., poverty, race relations, migrant labor, right to work, etc. Men's, Women's, and Youth groups are interested in the social problems that face our generation. Your Committee stands ready to help and give programs on those problems listed as well as on alcohol, school drop-out, the inner-city Church, or countless other problems.

We recommend:

1. That all Churches plan programs around social issues and call in Committee resource persons to provide leadership, material, and/or speakers.
2. That all Churches assist the school districts to implement the compliance plans that have been approved by the HEW in regard to school zone re-districting.
3. That all Churches give their membership the opportunity to contribute to the Racial Justice Now Committee of the denomination.
4. That all Churches in the Conference vote to declare open membership.
5. That all Churches have copies of the magazine, "SOCIAL ACTION," available for their membership.
6. That all Churches send delegates to the Social Action Institutes in the Conference and those on the National Level.
7. That all Churches in North Carolina come to a decision on and make a statement in regard to (a) sale of liquor by the drink, and (b) the establishment of breweries in the State.
8. That we actively support the Office of Economic Opportunity and, where applicable, the North Carolina Fund in the War on Poverty.
9. That each local Church form a Christian Social Action Committee to work in conjunction with the Conference Committee.

## (APPENDIX I)

### REPORT OF CHURCH AND MINISTRY COMMITTEE

The Committee for Church and Ministry held its first meeting at the Southern Conference office, Elon College, N. C., April 13, 1966.

The following procedure and schedule was set for students for the ministry making application for scholarship loan aid:

- a. Dr. Clyde Fields of the Conference staff is to receive application blanks from the national office. He will send the application blanks to students whose names were sent him by the Committees on Church and Ministry in the Acting Associations.
- b. The students are to complete the applications by May 31, 1966, and return them to Dr. Fields.
- c. Dr. Fields will forward the applications to the various Committees on Church and Ministry for their study and approval during June, 1966.
- d. The applications are to be returned to Dr. Fields by July 1, 1966. He will then forward same to the national office of the Council for Church and Ministry, where final approval is made.

The Committee for Church and Ministry presents the following resolution to the Southern Conference:

**RESOLVED:** that we reassure all ministers, whatever their standing may be in any of the Acting Associations, of the continuance of their present standing. Further, we urge our ministers and churches to strive to reach the standards as set forth in the Manual on the Ministry of the United Church of Christ.

It is understood that ministers hold their standing in the Associations and not in the Conference. In the Associations, therefore, licensure and ordination occur.

Your Committee has much to be done and seeks your counsel and your prayers that the Christian Ministry may be extended among us.

## (APPENDIX J)

### REPORT OF HISTORY COMMITTEE

The historical interests of our Southern Conference have been well represented through the activities of the three former constituent bodies:

1. **The Southern Synod** historical interests have been carried on by the Southern Synod chapter of the national Historical Society of the E & R Church. The chapter held its annual meeting November 7, 1965, and the chapter was also host to the national E & R Historical Society on August 14, 1965. Both of these meetings were held at Catawba College, and at both meetings the Chairman of the Southern Conference History Committee was accorded the honor of presenting papers on the "Beginnings and Beliefs of the Christian Church (denomination)." Rev. Frank Bostian of Charlotte, N. C., is the Chairman of the Southern Synod chapter.

A current project of the chapter is the gathering and publication of a "History of the Churches of the Southern Synod." Rev. Frank W. Snider is the Chairman of an editorial committee charged with the responsibility of getting this work done. Besides Dr. Banks J. Peeler, editor, and Mr. Snider, the other members of the Committee are: Dr. Lonnie A. Carpenter, Rev. Aubrey Hedrick, A. Howard White, and Frank Clapp. The Committee hopes to publish this work by the end of 1966 or the first of 1967.

Catawba College Library is the depository for the historical collection of the former Evangelical and Reformed Church in this area.

2. **Convention of the South.** The years 1966-67 will be important ones for the churches of the former Convention of the South, for they will mark the centennial year for many local churches, as well as for "Conferences" and "Associations." The North Carolina Conference, and perhaps other bodies, will be observing, with special ceremonies, the centennial year. Rev. J. P. Mangrum is preparing a history for that event in the North Carolina Christian Conference. Rev. J. Taylor Stanley is undertaking to prepare a valuable historical work in the writing of a history of the Negro churches of our fellowship in the South. Franklinton Center is serving as the depository for valuable historical collections relating to these churches.

3. **The Southern Convention Historical Society** vested its large and valuable historical collection in Elon College. For many years the College has provided housing and has assisted financially in providing a Curator for the Church History Room maintained by the Historical Society in the Carlton Library Building. Elon College in accepting the historical collection will continue to provide housing and custodial care for this historical collection. Mrs. Oma U. Johnson is Curator.

The Historical Society of the former Southern Convention authorized the collection of material for and publication of a "History of the Southern Convention." The Committee charged with this work consists of Dr. Clyde L. Fields, Chairman, Dr. J. H. Overton, Mrs. Mark W. Andes, Mrs. Oma U. Johnson, Dr. J. Earl Danieley, and William T. Scott. Dr. Scott has been elected Author Historian to gather and write this history.

Elon College invited the national E & R and CC Historical Societies to hold a joint meeting on its campus in 1966. Because of a special 1966 anniversary at the Barnstable, Massachusetts, Church, in which the CC Society is involved, the invitation will be renewed in 1967.

The General Synod of the United Church of Christ has authorized and constituted a Historical Commission to work for the correlation of the Congregational Christian and Evangelical Reformed National historical societies. Rev. Frank W. Snider is a member of that Commission.

As provided by action of the Conference, September 30, 1965, the Historical Committee of the Southern Conference presently consists of the following:

**Three Members-at-large elected by the Board of Directors of the Conference—**

Mrs. W. W. Sellers, Rev. Frank W. Snider, Rev. J. P. Mangrum;

**Three Members elected by the Board of Trustees of Catawba College—**

Dr. H. A. Fesperman, Dr. Banks J. Peeler, Dr. Felix Peck;

**Three Members elected by the Board of Trustees of Franklinton Center—**  
Rev. J. Taylor Stanley, Rev. F. A. Hargett, Rev. W. Judson King;

**Three Members elected by the Elon College Board of Trustees (to be elected in May, 1966).**

No person or organization comes to its real worth unless and until it recognizes and preserves its heritage, and adds to its heritage significant contemporary accomplishments. We feel that the work of the History Committee of the Southern Conference can be of great worth to our new and developing fellowship.

#### (APPENDIX K)

##### REPORT OF HEALTH AND WELFARE SERVICES COMMITTEE

Your coordinator, along with the Rev. Dr. W. W. Snyder and Mr. Charles F. Beidler, attended the annual meeting of the Council for Health and Welfare Services held in Dallas, Texas, February 14-18, 1966. This was most helpful.

The Most Reverend Raymond J. Gallagher, Bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Lafayette-in-Indiana, told the UCC Council for Health and Welfare Services in the keynote address that the principle of separation of church and state should never be ignored or violated.

However, religious groups must cooperate with the government in certain areas if they are to reach their fullest potential, said Bishop Gallagher, formerly secretary of the National Conference of Catholic Charities in Washington, D. C.

Bishop Gallagher said that "it is not a question today whether welfare programs ought to be public or private. It is a necessity for both. It is not a matter of one progressing at the expense of the other; it is a demand that they develop together. It is not a matter of hitching oneself to the other's star. It is a matter of both being clearly identified in the national firmament."

A three-man panel discussed "Christian Implications in the Manipulation of Life." They were Dr. Albert E. Heustis, Lansing, Michigan, state health commissioner; Dr. Allen O. Miller, Webster Groves, Missouri, professor at Eden Theological Seminary, and Rev. Paul E. Irion, professor at Lancaster (Pa.) Theological Seminary.

Dr. Sheldon E. Mackey, Philadelphia, Executive Secretary of the UCC Stewardship Council, and Dr. Lee W. Rockwell, Philadelphia, General Secretary of the UCBHM Division of Health and Welfare Services, also spoke at the annual meeting of the Council.

We note with justifiable pride that Dr. Walstein W. Snyder, Elon College, N. C., administrator of the Elon Home for Children, was elected President of the Council; Rev. John C. Ruhl, Marthasville, Missouri, Vice-President; Elmo

L. Fischer, New Braunfels, Texas, Secretary; and Rev. John W. Heistand, Fort Wayne, Indiana, Treasurer.

Miss Judith Ann Prange, Sheboygan, Wisconsin, received the 1966 Nurse-of-the-Year Award. She is a 1965 graduate of the School of Nursing of Evangelical Deaconess Hospital, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, of which Rev. R. Arthur Wagner is administrator.

Dr. and Mrs. John A. Smith received an award for 20 years of "meritorious service" at Ryder Hospital, Humacao, Puerto Rico, where Dr. Smith serves as medical director.

The Rev. Dr. Lee W. Rockwell, General Secretary, Health and Welfare Services, 1505 Race Street, Philadelphia, Pa. 19102, will be happy to assist the Conference and Associations, as well as local churches, by giving information and suggestions in the many areas of health and welfare services.

The Southern Conference has two outstanding homes for Children which render important services in the area of child care. Nazareth Children's Home, Rockwell, N. C., and the Elon Home for Children, Elon College, N. C., will be glad to serve you to any extent that they are able.

The United Church Retirement Home Board hopes to raise the necessary funds and establish a home for the aged and aging within the next few years. Our Conference does not have such a home; hence, we have not and are not now prepared to care for the elderly.

**We recommend:**

1. That each local church and related organization continue to give liberal support to our homes for children.
2. That each church of the Southern Conference that has contributed to the United Church Retirement Home \$1 per member during the past several years continue to do so.
3. That each local congregation of the Conference give prayerful consideration to the proposed home, and make a liberal donation, contributing at least \$1 per member.
4. That each local church of the Conference establish a Committee on Health and Welfare Services and charge the Committee with the responsibility for securing information on all health and welfare agencies and services available to the citizens of their community, through our Conference, and the United Church of Christ.

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE FOR LAY LIFE AND WORK**

Two meetings of the Committee for Lay Life and Work have been held since the Southern Conference came into being January 1st. The first was held January 8th at the Elon College Community Church, and the second, at Franklinton Center, March 13th, at the close of the Southern Regional Lay

Leaders' Meeting. Dr. Lightbourne and Mr. Rinker shared in both of these meetings and Mr. Morrison was present for the latter one.

The first project accepted by this committee was the sponsorship of the visit of Mrs. Robert G. Williams to churches and institutions in our Conference. She spoke on Our Christian World Mission and showed slides of her trip around the world to our mission stations.

The second project is the sponsorship of the Family Thank Offering, which provides an opportunity for "second mile" giving to Our Christian World Mission. Mr. C. W. (Bill) Starr of Greensboro is Chairman of this project, and is responsible for the Committee's display at the 1966 meeting of the Southern Conference.

The following actions were taken at the January 8th meeting:

**Recommended That:**

1. The present men's and women's coordinating committees continue with their program activities for 1966 under the guidance and with the cooperation of the CLLW.
2. The present lay organizations phase out their separate organizational lives in 1966, consistent with their financial, legal, and organizational responsibilities.
3. That a study of organizational possibilities for the future be made in order to be ready for operation by 1967. The special committee appointed for this purpose met April 13th in Greensboro with the Conference Minister.
4. The CLLW seek to promote new kinds of program opportunities and to work cooperatively with other Conference Committees in areas of common interest. (Rev. Larry Fisher was asked to serve as liaison with the Committee on Christian Education.)
5. The geographical areas as defined by the three administrative areas be observed in planning meetings.

**REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE FOR WORLD MINISTRIES**

Space Age Missions does not mean moon missions, but it does mean flexibility to invest and change direction continuously to meet the needs of a passing parade of people on our planet. We are vaguely aware of the hunger and illiteracy that abound in South America, Africa, and Southeast Asia. We comprehend to some extent the explosive situation of millions clamoring for a better life and the enticements of an atheistic Communism. Our failure in the area of World Ministries can well be the failure of our entire Christian Church effort. This is no time to debate the worn out proposition, "at home or abroad," but simply to take our commission as Christians with seriousness — "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel." Surely, we are now ready as a new and enlarged Conference to face a mammoth challenge.

As yet, the Committee for World Ministries of the Southern Conference has not met. Three reasons:

1. The imminence of elections this spring made us hesitant to expend travel money until we were sure of the personnel to be involved.
2. Pressing problems incurred by reorganization tend to relegate distant problems to the periphery.
3. Our Southern Conference Committee is not the same group that represents the Southern Conference in national meetings for World Ministries; therefore, there has been a breakdown in communication and motivation from national to state level.

This does not mean that thought and prayer have not been given to this area of concern. On the contrary, the Committee has been kept abreast of developments and together we have set the stage for work to begin in promoting World Ministries.

The following recommendation is offered:

That effort be made by the Nominating Committee and the Southern Conference delegates to include on this Committee personnel who represent us on the United Church Board for World Ministries.

In our conversations and planning as a committee some needs were always apparent:

1. Funds for overseas work.
2. A rethinking of our philosophy of overseas missions.
3. The relationship of Christian missions to government aid programs.
4. Key persons to fill vacancies in mission fields.
5. More programs and planning on the local level to educate and incite our members to aspire for world ministries.

#### (EXHIBIT C)

#### COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM

In our generation we have witnessed the swift succession of catastrophic events which we cannot fully understand, and are confronted with present, perplexing situations which keep us bewildered. We keep asking and seeking an answer to this question: "What is the meaning of this time?" Is it our function to speculate upon the course of history and to set the date for the consummation of the Kingdom of God? No! For if we ask: "Lord, will you at this time restore the kingdom of Israel?" the answer is still: "It is not for you to know times or seasons which the Father has fixed by his own authority. But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria and to the end of the earth." What is the meaning of this time? There is only one answer to this question, and that is, this is the time for the Church to press home its apostolic mission to the world.

The very nature of the Church is that it has a mission to mankind. That mission is our participation in God's redemption of the world through Jesus Christ, and yet, because of a multitude of circumstances and causes, we have failed in this mission and find ourselves as a fearful people facing a hostile world which listens to and follows after other prophets whose messages are incompatible with the Christian ethic.

We recognize our failure to evangelize and confess to Almighty God (1) that the Good News does not seem to mean much to us as contemporary Christians, (2) that we no longer feel the need to work as ambassadors for Christ, (3) that we have become introverted. Instead of extending our arms to the outcast, we have chosen to be complacent, (4) that we have become selective as far as who may belong to our local church memberships, (5) that we have escaped the responsibility of our non-Christian neighbors by leaving

them to the care of their own social classes, (6) that we have clung to antiquated and inadequate methods of evangelism, (7) that we are failing to communicate with the secular world, (8) that we lack the true spirit of unity which only the love of Christ can give. For these failures and others, we ask God's forgiveness.

But as we seek to have this mission renewed in our hearts by the Holy Spirit, let us make certain (1) that we soberly criticize ourselves to see why we have failed in our basic task, (2) that we repent of these failures and sins, (3) that we call for a recovery of the Good News, a Good News that will set people free from the idols of the world, (4) that we experience a theological revival in order to check the secular heresies of today, (5) that we re-evaluate our traditional methods of evangelism to see which ones should be continued, and which ones should be rejected, (6) that we try new experiments in evangelism, such as industrial chaplaincies, evangelistic service-centers, night ministry and other specialized ministries, (7) that we rediscover the power and influence of the laity who stand at the very outposts of the Kingdom of God. They are witnesses for Christ in every phase of life, whether it be as workers in factories, or as executives in business offices, or as professors in institutions of higher education, (8) that we grow more and more in the love of Christ, otherwise all our programs and efforts will profit us nothing.

The Evangelism Committee is in the process of planning a conference-wide Renewal Retreat which will be held September 10-12, 1968.

#### (EXHIBIT D)

#### COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN SOCIAL ACTION

Your Committee on Christian Social Action has been involved in many pressing problems of the day. Delegates attended the Conference for Peace in Charlotte; the N. C. Council of Churches meeting in Winston-Salem; the Consultation on Alcohol in Graham; the Social Action Institute in Avon Park, Florida; and many other special meetings. Your Committee sponsored a program on Understanding the National Council of Churches. More than 250 people attended this meeting at Catawba College Chapel. Dr. Burton W. Marvin was the NCC Speaker. This venture was a cooperative venture between the Methodist, Presbyterian, and the UCC.

The Migrant Ministry is a vital concern of the churches in North Carolina. The Church Women-United are vitally interested in this program and we commend them for this good work. Our staff resource person is Rev. James W. Morrison and we thank him for his dedicated work. The Committee stands ready to come to your church and to help in presenting a program on one of the critical issues of the day. In view of the kinds of problems we are now facing, we recommend the following:

1. In view of the fact that the Freedom of Choice Plan places the burden of responsibility on the parents who in many instances are subjected to intimidation, that all churches assist the school districts to implement the compliance plan that has been approved by HEW in regard to school zone redistricting.

2. That all churches view with concern the war in Vietnam, that the fighting men there be commended for their bravery and courage, that conscientious objectors be given their rights of conscience, and that all people act with discipline and responsibility, and that we do all within our power to bring this war to a satisfactory conclusion.

3. That all churches support the Governor's Good Neighbor Program under the N. C. Human Relations Council.

4. That all churches send delegates to Social Action Institutes in the Conference and to those held on the national level.

5. That all churches look into the problems of the American Indians living in their areas and seek to include them in their fellowship.

6. That churches make a real effort to show compassion for the alcoholic person, working especially with the underlying causes of alcoholism and not spend all their energies working on the symptoms that result from the consumption of alcohol.

7. That all churches view with alarm the disastrous potential of the psychedelic drugs (LSD, etc.) and insist on the strict control of their distribution.

8. That all churches assist in the War on Poverty by (a) supporting the program of the OEO (b) insisting on Open Housing and (c) working on voluntary services.

**(EXHIBIT E)**

**COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND MINISTRY**

The Southern Conference Church and Ministry Committee has sought to carry out its responsibilities in such areas of concern as: pastoral relations, professional standards, education for church-related vocations, scholarship aid for students in college and seminary, and in service training for ministers and continuing education for ministers.

19 students for the ministry received a total of \$6,094 in student aid scholarship loans from the Council for Church and Ministry of the United Church of Christ. We regret that student aid loans had to be cut 20% due to lack of OCWM Funds. We would encourage greater support for OCWM by all churches in our Conference.

Attention has been called to the numerous opportunities for in service training and continuing education refresher courses offered for ministers.

The Committee looked with favor on a bill before the General Assembly of North Carolina that would give ministers the same rights of privileged communication as permitted the medical profession.

The Conference Committee will seek to work closely with Association Committees as new Associations are formed.

The procedure for processing applications from students for the ministry for student aid scholarship loans was approved.

The Committee expressed concern that all ministers of the United Church of Christ be accorded equal opportunity for consideration as pastors of churches in our fellowship.

**THE HISTORICAL COMMITTEE**

The Historical Committee held its initial meeting on April 19, 1967 in the Church History Room at Elon College. The committee adopted a set of working rules to guide its operation and elected the Rev. Dr. Banks J. Peeler, vice-chairman and the Conference Minister, the Rev. Dr. James H. Lightbourne, Jr., secretary.

Each of the three bodies that consolidated to form the Southern Conference is in the process of preparing and publishing a history. The Rev. Dr. Banks J. Peeler is writing the history of the Southern Synod of the Evangelical and Reformed Church. The Rev. J. Taylor Stanley is writing the history of the Convention of the South of Congregational Christian Churches and your co-ordinator is involved in the same process for the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches. It should be noted that the Rev. J. P. Mangrum, a member of the Historical Committee, is preparing a history of the North Carolina Christian Conference of the Convention of the South.

The Historical Committee relates to the Historical Commission of the United Church of Christ and to the Congregational Christian Historical Society and the Evangelical and Reformed Historical Society. For the present the Southern Synod Chapter of the Historical Society of the Evangelical and

Reformed Church is active and continues its relationship to its corresponding national body.

The committee makes the following recommendations to the Conference:

1. That the Church History Room at Elon College be the temporary depository for the historical documents and materials of the Southern Conference and that the Conference Coordinator be the Custodian of such documents and materials.

2. That it be recommended to the churches and organizations of the Southern Conference that pictures, programs, newspaper articles, and other items of interest pertaining to significant meetings and services be preserved and copies sent to the Southern Conference.

#### COMMITTEE ON HIGHER EDUCATION

"The ministry to students, through the department of religion of the small college, the college-town church, or the student center, has as its purpose the growth of persons into their best potential; to comfort those who are lonely and unhappy, but to disturb those who are complacent; to counsel the confused and lost, and to provide a Christian environment on campuses where temptations lure the unwary and unprepared.

The true ministry to students drives them to ask ultimate questions, to study the facts and problems of personal life and of society from the Christian perspective, and to lead them to a sense of belonging to and being responsible for the Christian community. And at the center of it all is the purpose of facing them with their vocation of Christian student in which there can be no compromise with integrity, and out of which they will emerge as mature persons prepared to continue as Churchmen, Christian citizens and effective contributors to the life of the community."

This paragraph from the Newsletter of the Department of Campus Ministry states as well as can be stated briefly the purpose of the church's ministry to college students.

Here in the Southern Conference that ministry is discharged for us by our college town churches, our two church related colleges and our campus pastors serving on college and university campuses.

Campus pastors are at work on the campuses of Elon and Catawba Colleges, Duke University, and at North Carolina College. These ministers have special training in serving the campus and they are all making what the committee considers to be an outstanding contribution, not only to the lives of our students and faculty members, but to the total life of their respective campus communities.

Next year work will be initiated on a cooperative basis with the Presbyterians in Chapel Hill which will include United Church students. Likewise a united ministry will be established at A and T University in which we will be a participating denomination.

In each of the ministries in which we are engaged, the work is under the direction of a local Board. The Committee's responsibility is to appoint Board members and to make limited financial appropriations where the money is available through national and local sources. Every one of our programs could, with larger support, be expanded. Here is a responsibility which we as a Conference are only beginning to understand and which we must, as our student populations grow, discharge far more adequately.

**CATAWBA COLLEGE**  
**REPORT TO THE SOUTHERN CONFERENCE**  
**United Church of Christ**

Catawba College has just completed one of her best years, and in terms of numbers, her biggest. Enrollment in September was nine hundred ninety-eight, and the total number of students during the calendar year was well over twelve hundred.

Margaret Cunningham Woodson Hall and Julius W. Abernethy Hall were completed in August and dedicated on Homecoming Day in October. These dormitories accommodate a total of three hundred students and provide, with other dormitories, campus space for seven hundred fifty students. There are this year about two hundred fifty commuting students.

In addition to the dormitories completed during the year there has been continued renovation of the Hedrick Administration Building and expansion of the central heating system. New equipment has been installed in the language laboratory and testing and treatment rooms provided for the speech and hearing clinic.

The program of testing and therapy in speech and hearing is part of a larger program in Fine Arts being developed under a grant from the federal government to Catawba College and Livingstone College, in cooperation with George Washington University. One of the ultimate goals of this program is the preparation of urgently needed public school special teachers in this field.

Another curricular innovation is a summer field trip for students of Geology and Geography. Eighteen students are now beginning a four week trip to Utah and back, studying varying geological conditions as they travel.

Cooperative programs with other colleges through the Piedmont University Center continue. President Keppel, who has been Executive Director of the Center since its founding, will retire at the end of this month and will be succeeded by Dr. Paul Marrotte of the Davidson College faculty. A remarkably strong foundation for the Center has been laid under Dr. Keppel's guidance. We believe all such avenues of cooperative work are essential to the future development of small colleges like Catawba.

There have been many sacrificial gifts to Catawba during the past year but a few of special significance deserve mention. Miss Florence Wehr and Dr. Lulu Ruth Reed, both former faculty members, gave their homes and other property to the college through their estates. Dr. Reed's estate may provide,

upon settlement, more than fifty thousand dollars to endow scholarships and library support.

Mrs. Adrian L. Shuford, Sr. and Mr. and Mrs. Adrian L. Shuford, Jr. have given a pipe organ for the Catawba Chapel built by Southern Synod. The organ is now under construction by the Casavant Company and will be installed in the coming Spring.

For these special gifts and for all the generous support you have given us, we are grateful. But I remind you that the number of young men and women seeking higher education increases faster than the opportunity can be provided. We have been turning away prospective students for months because we had no more room for them. To provide for these students will require support on a scale far above that now provided by the church or its members. It seems to me that the decision must be made quite immediately whether the United Church of Christ intends to maintain its historic concern for higher education, or whether it will leave this significant task to someone else.

We need your continued interest and support, as we are grateful for what you have done.

### (EXHIBIT J)

### STEWARDSHIP AND OUR CHRISTIAN WORLD MISSION COMMITTEE

In seeking to encourage Christian Stewardship within the Southern Conference the committee has held two meetings to plan and implement the task assigned to it under the Constitution.

Briefly these include:

1. To foster principles and practices of Christian Stewardship.
2. To secure support for Conference budget.
3. To recommend specific goals for local churches.

4. To assess needs, encourage support of, and correlate time schedules of Special Fund drives for agencies and institutions.

#### In Areas of Stewardship Education:

1. Nine Area Workshops were held in September 1966 to help pastors and local finance chairmen with material-planning and preparation for Christian Enlistment programs in local churches. In preparation for these workshops, training sessions for leaders were attended by the Conference Coordinator and staff persons in June, 1966. Ninety local churches took part in the workshops.

Conference staff and Coordinator met May 10, 1967 with Regional Secretary Karlton Johnson to plan similar Workshops for fall of 1967 with special concern for churches that missed the 1966 series.

2. The Stewardship Photo-Essay project for 1967 on the theme "Stewards of Abundance" was promoted under the leadership of Rev. Robert Myers, Chairman.

3. A Leadership Training School was held in Portsmouth, Va. under direction of Rev. Bill Simmons with courses on Stewardship taught by Rev. Karlton Johnson and on Our Christian World Mission by Rev. Dr. Clyde Fields. 154 persons from 30 churches attended.

4. A Seminar on International Missions at Franklinton Center March 3-5 was attended by 55 persons.

5. The committee cooperated with the Lay Life and Work Committee in a program on Stewardship and Mission May 5-7 at Franklinton Center.

#### On Recommending Goals for OCWM:

Using previous giving and the Conference budget as guidelines, the committee worked out minimum goals that must be met if the Conference is to meet its obligations.

A challenge goal that would reflect a growth in Christian commitment and lead the Conference to a wider out-reach in missions and effectiveness was based on the principle of Stairway of Progress.

These minimum and challenge goals were listed in an issue of the Conference News with Stairway of Progress standing shown as a percentage of local budget.

#### Recommendations:

That local churches:

1. Make use of more of the material available from the Stewardship Council to help in a program of local stewardship—especially the booklet "Operations Banners Flying" (an excellent guide for local group and committee study). Also available from Southern Conference office is a very fine program (color slide and tape recording) on OCWM prepared by Mrs. Doris Isenhour and Mrs. Nevin Frantz under the direction of Rev. Donald Flick.

2. Adopt a practice of remitting OCWM payments on a systematic monthly basis.

The Coordinator acknowledges a debt of thanks to the committee members, the Conference staff, especially Rev. Dr. Clyde Fields as advisor to the committee, and to a number of people throughout the Conference who have given generously of time and counsel to help advance stewardship in the new Southern Conference. We solicit your prayers and suggestions.

The Rev. Carroll W. Lewis, a member of the committee and pastor of the Rosemont Church, Chesapeake, Va., the Conference Minister, and the committee chairman attended an Urban Church Consultation held by the United Church of Christ in St. Louis, Mo. in May.

In September the Southern Conference will be represented at a Town and Country Church Consultation in Columbus, Ohio sponsored by the National Council of Churches and several major denominations including our own.

The committee is exploring possibilities for new church starts in several areas, particularly in the Virginia region where several new developments are in consideration.

The CHURCH BUILDERS CLUB fund has received \$3,374.60 as of April 30, 1967. You are encouraged to contribute to it. The next annual appeal will be made in the year 1968.

The work of new church development is at the very heart of our ministry. We urge your continued interest, support and assistance to bring the church of our Lord Jesus Christ to the communities of our Conference.

### STATISTICAL REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE MINISTER

The Southern Conference, as of December 31, 1966 was composed of 413 congregations having a total membership of 68,603. There was a net gain in membership of 387 over the previous year.

The churches contributed \$2,345,764 to current local expenses, \$1,071,279 for capital expenditures, making a total of \$3,417,043 for local church expenses.

A total of \$342,672 was given to Basic Support and \$133,384 to other causes included in Our Christian World Mission—a total of \$476,056. Gifts to other benevolences amounted to \$50,815. The total benevolent contributions came to \$526,871.

There are 312 ordained ministers in full standing in the Southern Conference. 211 serve as active pastors. 35 are in the retired category. 50 ministers are involved in denominational work, as missionaries, military or campus chaplains, in educational work or in some other form of religious work. 16 are in business, a profession or some other kind of work.

17 ministers of the conference have "Conference Ordination" and there are 24 Licensed Ministers. 31 persons are In Care of Association. Most of these are students for the ministry or another form of full-time Christian service.

12 ministers of other denominations serve churches of the conference.

8 Directors of Christian Education serve churches within the conference.

6 persons are officially recognized in the Category of "Lay Ministry."

Of the 413 churches of the conference 9 are inactive and 20 are part time supply situations.

335 churches with a membership of 60,293 have standing in the United Church of Christ.

78 churches with a membership of 8,380 have not yet voted to be a part of the United Church of Christ.

**RESOLUTION TO BE PRESENTED TO THE SOUTHERN CONFERENCE  
OF THE UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST  
BY THE DELEGATES OF THE CORINTH UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST**

At a special meeting of the Consistory of the Corinth United Church of Christ, held on Sunday, June 11, 1967, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED: THAT the delegates of this Church to the Southern Conference annual meeting to be held on Tuesday and Wednesday, June 13 and 14, 1967, be instructed and authorized to present the following resolution to the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ;

THAT the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ considers it contrary to the spirit and structure of the Protestant Church for any individual to presume to speak for the Church body in political, secular, and social matters, such as occurred at the recent stockholders' meeting of Eastman Kodak Company, in instigating hearings before the Federal Communications Commission aimed at denying the license renewal of a Jackson, Mississippi television station, in criticizing our Country's actions in the Viet Nam war, in censuring Congress for unseating Rep. Adam Clayton Powell, and in supporting the National Council of Churches' appearance before Congress to advocate repeal of the Right to Work provision of the Taft-Hartley law;

THAT the United Church of Christ is essentially a congregation of individuals; THAT these individuals have never been polled for their opinions on these matters and other controversial issues. FURTHERMORE, THAT it is extremely doubtful if they were polled that a majority would hold the views expressed by the aforementioned Church officers or representatives; THAT we oppose the action of a so-called spokesman of the Church assuming to speak for the Church membership as a whole:

THAT even should a majority of the membership hold such views, we feel it improper to compel a minority of the membership to lend its strength and support to causes with which such minority disagrees;

FURTHER THAT we defend the right of any individual to speak out his opinions, so long as they are identified as his own opinions, and not those of the entire denomination, even though he may be an officer of such denomination;

THAT the delegates of this Conference to the General Synod be authorized and instructed to present this Resolution to the General Synod for consideration.

#### HEALTH AND WELFARE COMMITTEE

Your coordinator, along with the Rev. A. W. Hedrick, the Rev. Dr. W. W. Snyder, and Mrs. W. W. Snyder, attended the annual meeting of the Council for Health and Welfare Services of the United Church of Christ held in Chicago, Illinois, January 23-26, 1967.

Among the subjects discussed were—Day Care Centers for Children, Psycho-Social Needs of the Aging, Our Anxious Society, and The Church and O. E. O. We were warned by Jerry Hammerman against dissecting the older person into his physical, emotional, social, spiritual, and economic needs, lest he become a "Many Splintered Thing."

Administrators of Services to the Aging voluntarily voted to make joint accreditation the basic floor for membership in the Council.

George Pratt of England addressed the group, giving us some insight into comparable services in England as well as the role of the Church in Health and Welfare Services when the Government is deeply involved.

Awards were given honoring Sandra Jaschob as Student nurse of the year, and Carol Lambrecht as Nurse of the Year.

During 1966, care was provided for 604,075 individuals, at a cost of \$63,079,233. OCWM giving on National and Conference basis was \$17,703,147 total, or 28.1% of that which was spent is Health and Welfare Services.

Southern Conference is one of the 15 highest in total giving to agencies holding membership in the Council for Health and Welfare Services. Total Southern Conference Giving to OCWM in 1966 was \$342,756. Gifts to Health and Welfare agencies were \$49,704. Per Capita gifts to Health and Welfare agencies was \$ .796.

The Committee met once during the year. The Rev. Dr. Lee W. Rockwell, General Secretary of Health and Welfare Services met with the Committee in Burlington on April 28, 1967. The Rev. Dr. W. W. Snyder, the Rev. L. A. Leonard, the Rev. A. W. Hedrick, and the Rev. Dr. James Lightbourne met with the committee. This initial meeting was very valuable and the counsel and guidance of the above mentioned persons was very helpful.

### **REPORT OF ELON HOME FOR CHILDREN TO SOUTHERN CONFERENCE**

Today, as over against 60 years ago, our Elon Home for Children is a multiple service agency. We offer new group care, foster care and day care. When the first child was received the Home offered only group care. Today in all three of the services in which we are involved, we are licensed by the State Department of Public Welfare of North Carolina. We are pleased that in the last several months our Home has received its license in group care and foster care, bringing up to date all three of our services; our day care program having been licensed within the year.

While the total capacity for the Home today in group care is far less than what it was in the earlier years, the Home today serves more children. For instance, in the past year the Home served almost a hundred children in the area of group care. The capacity for the Home in group care is 72 children. The reason for the nearly a hundred served is the fact that there was a turn over of better than 25 children in the past year. Today we have not only the capacity for 72 children but are licensed in foster care of 12 children. In day care we have a licensed capacity for 30 children. During the nine month school year this capacity has been reached and kept during these months. It is expected that during the summer months that lie ahead, we will serve at almost full capacity.

In the past year in the various meetings we have been able to attend such as our own Council for Health and Welfare of the United Church and the Southeastern Child Care Association meeting here in our own state, we have come to see the need of the working together of church related institutions with institutions supported and guided by the state. We can no longer believe that it is a matter of either church or state as over against church and state. We believe that today it is necessary for one to augment the other. No longer can the church carry the full load in the area of health and welfare, whether it be child care or caring for the elderly. This, however, does not mean that the church still does not have a role to play. Since hearing George Pratt of England this past year at our Health and Welfare Council, we believe, that it is possible for State and Church to work together. We do not believe that it is necessary for the church to lose its identity in this area.

A good example to us of this is the fact that this past spring we were told by our County unit of the State Department of Public Education that under the ESEA, Title I program there was available a Federal Grant of \$9,567 to our Home. The money is to be spent for educational purposes and will be used for such projects as tutoring programs which will permit some 25 to 30 of our boys

and girls to attend summer school, for the purpose of purchasing Encyclopedias and other supplement books as well as other helpful items for better educating our children. Now had we not had these funds available, we could not have done these things for these children. Should anyone think this would make our financial load less so far as the Home is concerned, this is not true. The funds will be used to assist children who have been seriously neglected and thereby have been deprived of attaining the educational standing that they ought to have attained in accordance to their age.

Financially the Home continues to have need. There are many things that yet need to be done. We are grateful for those things we have been able to accomplish and for the support that we have received thus far. For a Home to say that it can take pride in the amount that it spends per child per year, we do not believe is any high honor. Neither do we think it is any honor for us to say that we spend the lowest. We believe we should make every effort to make every penny count that we receive. Last year the cost in our Home was \$6.60 per child per day. This is an increase over what it has been before. This will probably continue to increase because of the increased cost of living. From our churches this past year we received \$22,784. For this we are certainly grateful. This, however, we must realize represents less than a third of our budget. Many times people have the mistaken idea that the church pays the total cost of care for children. This is not done anywhere in any institution in Health and Welfare that we know of in the United Church of Christ or any other church related institution. We are at the distinct disadvantage of not having endowment funds, therefore, it has been necessary for us to seek in every way possible support to do the work that we do. The Elon Home for Children has a mail appeal program that we have used successfully for three years. This has been of tremendous help to us in our effort to put forth a valid program. We believe that if a Home for Children is to serve children that it should have a valid, qualified program, one with an adequate Social Service Staff, one with an adequate Administrative Staff as well as an adequate Child Care Staff.

We believe that this must be a program wherein we offer help to children regardless of race, color or creed. Within the next several weeks, there will come to live on our campus two Indian children from the eastern part of North Carolina. These will be received into care because of their need. They will not be received simply because they are of another race, and at no time does our Home intend to receive any purely for that reason. We will receive applications from any individuals, regardless of race, color or creed. We will examine them and at that point when the need is established, we shall render what ever service we possibly can. We are grateful for our Board of Trustees, who has given us this privilege to serve in this way. We are grateful that we can administer to the needs of those who cannot help themselves.

It is not our intention at the Elon Home for Children to expand our services. It is, however, our hope in the next three years to put on a capital improvement program, perhaps in the neighborhood of \$300,000 to a half million dollar campaign. These funds will be used for the purpose of capital improvements whereby we would more adequately serve those in our care. Perhaps part of these funds would be used for endowment purposes. These are decisions yet to be decided. The Board of Trustees in its spring meeting directed the finance committee to consult with a capital fund raising concern

to see what we could hope to raise three years from now. Therefore, we would like to say to this conference that after our fall meeting on November 8th and 9th we will send to the Board of Directors a request with specific information as to the amount and as to the time. The general feeling of our Board of Trustees at this time is we would like to put on a campaign in the year 1970. This would be approaching churches, individuals and industry and business. Therefore, this would mean that we would be putting on a capital improvement plan some ten years after the last one which was in 1960.

Now in conclusion, what does the future hold for child care services in our Southern Conference? There are those who have put forth the position that Elon Home for Children and Nazareth Children's Home should in all probability be merged and be one agency. Looking at the situation from the the standpoint of the Child Welfare League, it seems to us that both of these agencies can render a service in the area where they are located. The child care authorities have said that group homes such as ours having less than a hundred can render valuable service. This is especially true when group homes are broken down into small family units. It is much better to have a home of fifty to seventy-five than to have a home of one hundred fifty or better. Therefore, we hope very much that we will think in terms of the continuation of both agencies. However, we believe that these agencies in all probability ought to look forward to the day when they can work under one Coordinator or Administrator and one Board of Trustees. We realize that this is perhaps well in the future. The need for care to children is going to continue to increase. The state supported agencies can only do so much. There will still be a place for church related institutions. Therefore, we hope our Southern Conference, along with the United Church of Christ, will continue to support fully the Health and Welfare Council as they continue to set the highest standards possible in meeting the needs of children in care. It is our hope that we will work together in seeing to it that our denomination shares in this area of responsibility.

#### **REPORT OF NAZARETH CHILDREN'S HOME**

This report comes to you from limited experience, as the writer has been Superintendent of Nazareth Children's Home only since January, 1967. These first few months have been extremely busy ones. We have worked tirelessly in seeking to learn the various aspects of child care, and in fulfilling the many demands of the office of Superintendent.

Nazareth Home is under the supervision of a Board of Managers, consisting of twelve members elected by the Southern Conference, along with six additional men who may be added by the Board itself. Also, the Conference Minister, the Associate Minister serving the Area, and the Chairman of the Committee on Health and Welfare are ex-officio members.

We come to the Home with a deep commitment to the importance of the work it does in our society. The Home was founded for boys and girls who are without the care and love of father and mother, and continues to serve that

basic purpose. It is a part of the historic concern of the Church for all people in need, stemming from our Lord's expression of compassion. Through the Home we extend a helping hand to children who, through no fault of their own, are deprived of a normal home with parents; we minister to their wounded emotions; we seek to lead them in the way of developing dignity, purpose, and Christian perspective in life.

One of the things that has required much of our time and effort is that of improving the physical property of the Home. It is our belief that if we are to develop first-class citizens we need to have first-grade physical facilities, such as will encourage the youngsters to appreciate and seek a higher social and economic level than the one from which so many of them have come. Already we are pleased to report that substantial progress has been made in this area.

Concerning the enrollment of the Home during the year of 1966, twenty-six boys and girls were dismissed from the Home. Twenty-one of these children returned to live with relatives or parents (three as high school graduates), and five were placed in other agencies. Also, during the year, twenty-nine boys and girls were admitted to the Home. As of December 31, 1966, the Home had an enrollment of thirty-two boys and twenty-five girls, for a total of fifty-seven children. We continue to receive more applications than we are able to accommodate. First preference is given to referrals from our own ministers and churches, and acceptance is made only in cases where there is real need and an indication that the Home can meet this need.

All of our children attend the public schools serving the area, and they make scholastic achievements near the average of those children coming from normal home environments. Recreational activities are considered to have a therapeutic value, and are enjoyed throughout the year. However, life at the Home also includes definite work assignments for each child in keeping with his age, and these must be carried out as a part of his training and growing. The girls do housekeeping and kitchen duties. The boys help with maintenance of the grounds and with farm chores. Lyerly Memorial Church is the community church which serves the Home. Active participation in Sunday School, Worship Services, Choir and Daily Vacation Bible School is a regular part of the life of the children. At proper age the children are given confirmation instruction and are confirmed into church membership.

Plans for the future are continually in focus at Nazareth Home. The Payne Building, which was erected in 1924, has become increasingly outmoded as a dormitory for girls. At a recent meeting of the Board of Managers, action was taken to appoint a Building Committee for the purpose of preparing final plans for either a combination cottage unit, or for two separate units. This would replace the facilities now used in the Payne Building, as there is no thought of enlarging the enrollment of the Home. Consideration is being given to an appeal for funds to assist in this building program, and a tentative request for such an appeal has already been placed before the Committee on Health and Welfare. Also, at this same meeting the Board took note of the need for additional staff help for the Home as it serves in our complex society, with more and more children coming from broken homes and from disturbed emotional backgrounds. This is reflected in an enlarged budget adopted for the next fiscal year.

Concerning finances, Nazareth Home does not receive funds from O.C.W.M., and its program has continued to be conservative. However, we are very grateful for a balanced budget, and for the generous free-will giving that has made this possible. Many of our churches have placed in their budgets an item of support for Nazareth on the basis of two dollars per member. The Board commends this practice. Other churches depend upon special offerings in providing their support.

COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Two regular committee meetings were held at Durham (October 15 and March 11): in addition the annual Christian Education Consultation was held with Committee members, acting association Christian Education personnel, and Christian Education Associates (November 11, Durham). The Rev. John Westerhoff III was the guest leader for this special gathering to hear of national emphases and discuss Conference concerns and directions for 1967.

**CHILDREN'S MINISTRY.** From May 7-21, ten Vacation Church School Workshops were held across the Conference. Attendance at three was very poor (Suffolk, New Bern, Garner); response to the others was good to excellent. A Demonstration Workshop for children's workers (primary, lower junior, junior) is planned for August 11-13 in the Burlington area; leaders will be trained at this workshop to carry out similar workshops in the three administrative areas in late fall or early winter. Miss Louise Drew of our national staff in Boston will lead. Mailings have gone out from this sub-committee relative to Church School Day last year.

**YOUTH MINISTRY.** The word with youth work is SCUFY. Actively engaged in planning for the reorganization of the Southern Conference senior and middle high young people, some thirty-five young people and adults have met numerous times in three sub-committees (structure, finances, communication). Their final meeting was held April 1; October 15 will be the Sunday when the twelve district reorganizational meetings will be held. From that point Association and Conference organization will proceed with an emphasis on program help and unified emphases. The 1967 YOUTH FORUM will bring together middle high and senior high youth of the Conference at Elon College June 23-25. Leaders will be Dr. Sylvanus Duvall, and the Rev. Robert L. Polk. This weekend is to be followed by the Senior High Planning and Training Conference at Moonelon, June 25-July 1. The 1967 Vocations Retreat comes up at Moonelon September 23-24. The attendance last year for what was the first official Southern Conference retreat for young people was 71 fulltime and 12 part-time for consideration of vocational concerns. Our delegates for the National Youth Forum at Cleveland this year are: Janet Lynch (Suffolk), Linda Grimes (Greensboro), Nazareth Holman (Franklin) and the Rev. James Peeler (Lexington). We are also involved in the National Planning Conference on Confirmation Education, Notre Dame University, November 6-10, with a committee of six who will follow through in the Conference as we seek to minister to the needs of local churches in this critical area of youth work. Finally, in youth work, the newsletter SCUFY has gone out monthly to all ministers, key youth leaders and officers (about 900 per issue).

**ADULT MINISTRY.** The Family Life Camp, July 30-August 5, at Moonelon, will have the Rev. Walter E. Dobler, national staff worker from Boston, and the Rev. and Mrs. John Parsons, furloughed missionaries from South Africa, as leaders. Each Wednesday during Lent 1967, the Sedalia Study Series was conducted interdenominationally using the summer curriculum resource on worship produced by our denomination. Between 15-20 attended. Each Monday in April a series on the United Church of Christ was held at the Edgewood United Church of Christ for churches in the Burlington

area; attendance was from 4-13. Two workshops were held on the **Adult Uniform Lesson** materials; at Portsmouth no one attended and at Burlington 34 were present. In work for adults on college campuses, the major amount of time was spent in the organization of the **Campus Christian Ministry** at A & T College in Greensboro, where a new campus minister has been called and will begin serving through the combined auspices of several denominations of which we are one.

**LEADERSHIP MINISTRIES.** Continuing to serve as carriers of the major load in providing leadership training opportunities across our Conference, the **Christian Education Associates** participated in many area and local meetings during the past year. To "recharge their batteries" two CEA gatherings were held in April (Franklinton Center and Thomasville). In 1968 (August 27-30) a national **Christian Education Conference** will be held at Notre Dame University; hopefully many of our CEA workers can attend. The third annual **Christian Education Consultation** in our Conference will be held December 7; Dr. Edward Schlingman and Miss Ethel Shellenberger, both of the national Specialized Ministries staff, will be with us then. **The Christian Education Institute** at Franklinton Center, Bricks, is coming up August 4-6 with the theme "Churchmanship." **Association Christian Education Committees** will activate in the Fall.

**SPECIALIZED MINISTRIES.** The largest portion of the work done by this sub-committee is in the area of **camps and conferences**. This year there will be a total of eighteen opportunities in this area. Among the special ones is the **Work-Travel Seminar** for senior high young people; in this July 23-August 2 period they will travel to St. Louis and share in a variety of experiences. **Total attendance** at camps and conferences in 1966 was 734 young people at the three facilities (Franklinton Center, Johns River Valley, Moonelon Center) in regularly scheduled events; in addition there were 185 adults in the program. Johns River Valley showed a youth increase of 32; Moonelon Center showed a decrease of 59 over the preceding year. Training for 1967 workers was at Moonelon, May 30-31, led by Dr. Edward Schlingman.

**OTHER PROGRAMS.** We also share in other kinds of programs in Christian Education. **Student Summer Service** workers serve each year under the joint sponsorship of our Conference and the national Division of Christian Education. A **Christian Education Associate** works with your minister of Christian Education in a nationally sponsored program (Division of Christian Education) to encourage young people to consider the educational ministry as a possible vocational choice. In 1966 Mr. Henry Simmons, Washington Terrace United Church in High Point, was the Associate. This year it will be Mr. Lee Sloan of China Grove, Mt. Zion United Church of Christ. Several of our churches also participated in the **current evaluation** program being conducted by our denomination for our curriculum.

I would be remiss if I failed to express my appreciation to the members of this Committee for their self-less labors these past months. Thanks, too, for all who have had a share in our educational mission.

COMMITTEE ON LAY LIFE AND WORK

During the past year, the committee has sponsored the following activities for the men and women of the Southern Conference:

1. Men's and women's sub-committees were appointed to plan for the formation of men's and women's organizations at the conference level. On Nov. 12, 1966, the Church Women of the U. C. C. were organized at a meeting of 350 women held at the First Christian Church in Burlington. Mrs. J. R. Kernodle of Burlington was elected president. On Nov. 27, 1966, the Churchmen's Fellowship was organized at a meeting of 122 men held at the First Reformed Church in Burlington. Mr. Dale Bennett of Greensboro, N. C. was elected president. The executive committees of both groups have met and made plans for financial support from local church organization and for administrative area meetings in the Fall of 1967.

2. A Women's Summer Conference was held at Elon College June 21-24, 1966 with 165 women attending. Rev. Rudolph Raber of St. Louis, Missouri was the bible study leader. Mr. Michael Brooks of the N. C. Fund, Rev. Edward M. Brown of the National Council of Churches and Rev. Dr. Judson King of Franklinton Center were resource people for the "Poverty and Affluence: Dilemma for Christians" theme. Mrs. Wm. M. Alexander was chairman of the conference.

3. An informal Family Camping week-end was held at Johns River in August. Families from throughout the Conference were invited to bring their own camping equipment and participate in the fun. Mrs. S. A. Isenhour and Mr. Bill Starr were co-chairmen.

4. Spiritual Retreats for women were held in each administrative area in October, 1966. Rev. George Nishimoto of the Council for Church and Ministry and Mrs. F. C. Lester of the Council for Lay Life and Work staff were the leaders. The subject was "Self-Renewal." Approximately 450 women attended.

5. An International Seminar was held at Franklinton Center, Bricks, N. C. March 3-5, 1966 under the joint sponsorship of the Committee for Lay Life and Work and the Committee on World Ministries. Fifty-six persons shared in this experience including Rev. T. A. Braun of the UCBWM, Mrs. F. C. Lester, Mrs. Ed Riggs on furlough from our South India Mission, and international guests from Ghana, India, Honduras and Indonesia. One was a third generation Christian, one a Hindu with Christian leanings, one a Roman Catholic and one a Buddhist. The churches were asked to nominate people who did not normally participate in activities outside their local area. It was an exciting experience with many of the participants being younger people.

6. Eight Laity Program Planning Workshops were held in April, 1967. One was in Virginia, two in Eastern North Carolina, and five in Western North Carolina. Local committees planned and carried out the workshops with the help of area ministers. Program material available for use by adults for the 1967-68 year on the theme of "Living Our Faith in Today's World" were presented. "Christ and the Faiths of Men" and "Japan" were interdenominational mission materials discussed in addition to the materials in Program

Opportunities for Adults. Approximately 750 people participated in these meetings.

7. In cooperation with the Committee on Stewardship and OCWM, a Churchmanship Seminar was held at Franklinton Center May 5-7. The guest leader was Dr. Norman Jackson, Executive of the new Ecumenical Center in St. Louis and professor at Eden Seminary. He is also a member of the UCC Council for Lay Life and Work. The 30 participants shared in discussions of the mission of the church in the world today and learned about various facets of OCWM supported by the Southern Conference.

8. Promotion of the Family Thank Offering was done under the leadership of Mr. Bill Starr.

9. Promotion of Laity Sunday was done by Mrs. Henry Kennedy, Jr.

10. A Lay School of Theology was held at Blowing Rock Assembly Grounds May 19-21 in cooperation with the Southern Synod Christian Education Committee. Dr. Richard Schiemann of Catawba College was the guest leader on the topic of "You and Christian Ethics." Mrs. Van Grimes served as chairman.

11. Plans are underway for a Women's Summer Conference to be held at Catawba College from July 18-21, 1967. Mrs. S. A. Isenhour is chairman.

Mr. Robert Baxter, Reverend James Morrison and Mrs. Wm. M. Alexander attended the Lay Leaders Assembly at Elmhurst, Ill. June 24-26, 1966. The theme of the meeting was the Changing Roles of Men and Women in Today's Society.

Mrs. Alexander attended a workshop on Lay Theology sponsored by the Council for Lay Life and Work in Rye, N. Y. January 6-9, 1967.

Mrs. S. A. Isenhour, chairman of the Women's Summer Conference for the Southern Conference and a member of the Church of the Master, Hickory, and Mrs. Frazier O'Leary, president of the Norfolk Council of Church Women United, Norfolk, Va. and a member of the Bayview UCC, represented this area at a women's seminar on "The Changing South and the New Generation" held at the Howell House, Atlanta, Ga., February 24-26.

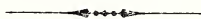

An amendment was moved and seconded that the name of the committee on Institutions be changed to the committee on Education, Health and Welfare and to change the wording to the proper form wherever it appears in the By-Laws.

An amendment to the amendment was moved and seconded that the name of the committee be Committee on Higher Education-Health and Welfare.

The Historical Committee shall be composed of the Coordinator, three (3) members-at-large elected by the Board of Directors of the Conference, three (3) members elected by the Board of Trustees of Elon College, three (3) members elected by the Board of Trustees of Franklinton Center, one (1) member elected by the Board of Trustees of Catawba College, and two (2) members elected by the Southern Chapter of the Historical Society of the Evangelical and Reformed Church.

The Committee shall promote the appreciation of church history through the encouragement of published research, the collection and preservation of historical materials, and shall encourage preparation for anniversaries in local churches, Associations and the Conference.

The Committee shall work closely with the Elon College Library, the Catawba College Library, Franklinton Center, the Congregational Christian Historical Society, the Evangelical and Reformed Historical Society, the Historical Commission of the United Church of Christ, and the Archives of the United Church of Christ, Lancaster, Pa.

It was moved to amend the first paragraph of the amendment by substituting the following:

The Historical Committee shall be composed of the Coordinator and three (3) members from each of the Administrative Areas elected at the annual meeting and three (3) members-at-large elected by the Board of Directors.

A Hymn Sing and the Conference Worship Service were held in the Elon College Community Church. Professor Jack O. White, Choir Director, led the congregation in the singing of hymns. The Rev. Thomas R. Hamilton, pastor of the church, and the Rev. James H. Lightbourne, Jr. served as Liturgists and the Rev. Joseph H. Evans was the Preacher.

After the service informal meetings for interested persons were held with Dr. Herbert Van Meter of the Board for World Ministries and Dr. Hartland H. Helmich of the Council for Lay Life and Work.

Wednesday — June 12

The Conference was called to order at 9:00 a.m. by the President. Mrs. Robert M. Kimball, Vice-President of the Conference, led the Hymn and Prayer.

Dr. Lightbourne, in his brief address, called upon the churches of the Southern Conference to become involved in constructive efforts to achieve equal opportunity in education, housing and employment in their local communities. In many communities United Church congregations can build bridges between churches of different racial backgrounds. The Conference Minister pledged the assistance of the Conference Staff and the Christian Social Action Committee in these efforts.

REPORT OF WORLD MINISTRIES COMMITTEE

The Committee on World Ministries met in Durham, N. C. on February 17, 1968. The following sub-committees reported:

**Foreign Students**—Rev. Carl Wallace reported that foreign students are available on our college campuses. A list of approximately sixteen hundred is available from the North Carolina Council of Churches' office. Thus far very few churches have taken advantage of this availability.

**Audio-visual materials**—Mr. Robert Forbes reported that new materials are being listed through CLLW. State and local libraries were cited as depositories of valuable films for many of our themes.

**Overseas Personnel**—Mrs. Donald Dearborn stated the continuing need for mature persons qualified to fill specific functions overseas. Job descriptions are available from our World Ministries Office in New York.

**Clothing for Overseas**—Mrs. Ray Gordon reemphasized the need of our continuing to support this endeavor.

**Visiting Missionary Speaker**—Rev. Edwin Alcorn presented the itinerary for Mrs. Robert G. Williams (March 25-April 5, 1968). She spoke fourteen times to various groups of the Southern Conference during this period.

**International Seminars**—After an evaluation of the seminar conducted in the Spring of 1967 as a joint project with CLLW the Committee of the Whole decided to urge similar projects for the Associations. Dr. Sterling Whitener and Mrs. Donald Dearborn are serving in Western North Carolina in this capacity and such a seminar is presently scheduled for May 31-June 2, 1968 at Blowing Rock Assembly Grounds.

**National Board for World Ministries** to meet in Greensboro, N. C. November 11-13, 1968. The following sub-committee was appointed to coordinate and plan for the fullest possible use of outstanding persons in our Southern Conference Area in reference to this meeting: Rev. Edwin Alcorn; Dr. Sterling Whitener and Mrs. Donald Dearborn.

**Working Relationship with Honduras and Mexico.** The following proposal is offered for approval by the Southern Conference:

The Southern Conference, upon recommendation by the Committee on World Ministries, is ready to cooperate with the United Church Board for World Ministries and the Stewardship Council of our denomination in Mexico and Honduras for a period of two years with the possibility of a two year renewal. The following principles shall be developed:

1. This emphasis is to be one of education and inspiration for the local church and its members.

2. Increased giving resulting from this emphasis shall be directed through the regular channels for basic support and/or directed gifts and Second Mile giving.

3. Develop "sister churches" between those in Mexico and the Southern Conference.

4. Bring persons of like professions into contact with another.

5. Provide to local churches a list of nationals from this area who reside here, study at universities, teach, work in industry, etc.

6. Assist the Board for World Ministries in cooperation with the Speakers' Bureau of the Stewardship Council in placing return missionaries in strategic locations for presentations and dialogue.

7. Encourage churches to make a study of Mexico and Honduras in every aspect of its life including economical, political, sociological areas as well as a study of the churches.

8. Conduct a Study Tour to Mexico and Honduras.

9. Develop a resource guide book which provides a bibliography of material in the areas of concern such as Poverty, Population Explosion, Education, Health and Politics.

10. Gather and publicize audio-visual material in both the National and Conference Audio-Visual libraries.

11. Serve as a clearing house for ideas and information that all churches might offer or need.

12. Explore the possibility of having a missionary in residence for this area at one of our colleges or children's homes over an extended period of time.

The office of Rev. Edwin Alcorn shall serve as a clearing house for details and implementation of the above.

**REPORT OF THE CHRISTIAN SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE**

The Social Action Committee of the Southern Conference has concerned itself with some of the many problems of our day. At a recent meeting of the committee, we attempted to come to a better understanding of our function and to suggest to our churches ways that would be effective in meeting the social problems we face.

One of the things that concern us as a committee is that we do not always know what the various churches are doing to make the Gospel of Jesus apply to the many problems of our community life. For we believe that one of the effective services this committee can render is to serve as means through which the churches may share programs that they have found meaningful and applicable to their situation. Therefore, this committee suggests that the churches keep the chairman of this committee informed as to what they are doing in the area of social action.

As a committee, we are also concerned with programs that have already been established in your community.

It concerns us that many persons are simply critical of programs without offering assistance to correct or aid in the removal of imagined or real wrongs. We, as a committee, urge that local churches discover, for example, wherein they may provide assistance both in terms of manpower and ideas to established community action groups, such as programs administered by the Office of Economic Opportunity.

We, also, suggest that each church seriously ask themselves what help they might give to the jobless. By this we mean from helping a person find a temporary job opportunity to helping a person locate a permanent job.

It is our conviction that we as individuals and as local churches have failed to recognize the tremendous work that has and is being done by Franklinton Center at Bricks. Dr. Judson King and those who help him need the assistance and support of every Church in order that the quality work of the Center may continue.

We urge all churches to consider establishing day-care centers in areas where this service is not provided. In small population centers, a day-care center would prove a needed service to the community. In most cases after initial equipment investment, such a service is self-supporting.

There arises in every community occasional needs for emergency help. The complexities of the times often bring about serious family problems. Often times it may be the need for help in times of extended illnesses in families. The Church can be there not only with compassion but with a helping hand.

Within the context of a fellowship that calls itself Christian, it should not be necessary to suggest the need for hands to be extended across racial lines. However, it would still concern this committee even if racial problems only involved those who are not Christians. But it is an empirical fact that too many roots of racial unrest extend into the Church of Christ. This is to the shame of any fellowship that is under the canopy of Christ. We would be derelict to the call of Christ if we did less than to ask each Christian to examine his conscience in the light of the Spirit of Christ our Lord and the teachings of the New Testament Scriptures. "But now in union with Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near through the shedding of Christ's blood. For he is himself our peace. Gentiles and Jews, he has made the two one, and in his own body of flesh and blood has broken down the enmity which stood like a dividing wall between them; for he annulled the law with its rules and regulations, so as to create out of the two a single new humanity in himself, thereby making peace. This was the purpose, to reconcile the two in a single body to God through the cross, on which he killed the enmity." (Ephesians 2:13-16, NEB).

We, therefore, recommend that every Christian within the Southern Conference Churches use every opportunity that is afforded by the Southern Conference, the member association and local churches to participate as ". . . fellow citizens of the household of God," (Ephesians 2:19b KJV), in work of this denomination.

**REPORT OF CHURCH AND MINISTRY COMMITTEE**

The Church and Ministry Committee of the Southern Conference has sought to carry out its responsibilities in areas of concern such as: pastoral relations, professional standards, scholarship aid, and in service training.

21 students for the ministry will apply for scholarship loans from the Council for Church and Ministry of the United Church of Christ. Your Committee works with these students in the process of securing loans.

Your Committee has worked closely with the two new Association Church and Ministry Committees in North Carolina. We have also sought to be helpful to the Virginia Acting Association Committees.

We have worked out and developed Church and Ministry Guidelines and Interpretations for use in connection with "The Manual on the Ministry" of the United Church of Christ and referred its use to Association Church and Ministry Committees.

We have worked out and developed a "Southern Conference Course of Study" for License and Ordination of candidates for the Ministry who would not normally be able to meet the qualifications for full College and Seminary Training. We have referred this course to the Association Church and Ministry Committees for implementation and use.

We have viewed with appreciation the many hours of service rendered to the churches and the ministry by the members of Association Church and Ministry Committees.

We view with concern some of the practical problems of the ministry such as: adequate salary, rapport between minister and church, increasing educational and professional demands laid on the ministry, and the frustration that comes from never having enough time to do all that is needed to be done. We seek for all our ministers the interest and concern of all our laity.

#### REPORT OF THE HISTORICAL COMMITTEE

There are several items of interest that fall within the concern of the Historical Committee.

First—Dr. J. Banks Peeler is continuing his work on "A Story of the Southern Synod." It is anticipated this history of the Southern Synod will be published within the year.

Your committee coordinator is at work on the "History of the Southern Convention" and it, too, should be published in the next year.

Second—The State of North Carolina in response to requests for same has placed an Historical Marker at the O'Kelly Chapel Christian Church in Chatham County. This church was the first one established by the Rev. James O'Kelly, principal leader in the founding of the Christian Churches in 1794.

Efforts are being made to secure an Historical Marker acknowledging the work of the Rev. Samuel Suther who was a pioneer Reformed Church minister in North Carolina in 1739-1786.

Third—This is to remind us all that the Church History Room at Elon College is the temporary depository for the historical documents and materials of the Southern Conference.

Fourth—The Historical Commission of the United Church of Christ coordinates the work of the Historical Society of the Evangelical and Reformed Church and the Congregational Christian Historical Society. The Rev. Frank W. Snider, of the Southern Conference, is a member of the Commission.

The Historical Commission of the United Church and the two national historical societies will meet within the boundaries of the Southern Conference at Elon College on April 15, 1969. This is a significant event and deserves our interest and support.

**(EXHIBIT F)**

**RESOLUTIONS TO THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONFERENCE**

- A. 1. Resolutions may be submitted only by churches, institutions, and other recognized organizations of the Conference, its Association, and the United Church of Christ.
2. Local churches may submit resolutions voted by the congregation or governing body of the congregation to the Conference for action.
3. Institutions and other organizations may submit resolutions voted by their governing boards or membership.

Resolutions may be of the following kinds:

- B. 1. A resolution calling upon the Conference to launch a particular kind of program (not capital fund campaigns).
  - 2. A resolution calling upon the Conference to terminate or curtail a particular program.
  - 3. A resolution calling upon the Conference to issue a pronouncement of its Christian conviction on a matter of social principle directed to the churches and the general public.
  - 4. A resolution recommending action in a specific situation of social concern.
- C. Resolutions must be submitted in writing to both the Conference Minister and the President of the Conference at least six weeks prior to the annual meeting of the Conference.
- D. At least one week before the annual meeting the body must provide the Conference Minister with sufficient copies of the proposed resolution for distribution to the delegates and visitors to the annual meeting at the time of registration.
- E. At its own discretion the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors may recommend to the annual meeting of the Conference that the resolution be adopted or that it be rejected. It is the responsibility of the Executive Committee, acting as the Business Committee of the annual meeting, to make provision on the agenda for action on the resolution. The proposed resolution and the recommendation of the Executive Committee may be made on the first day of the annual meeting, but action shall not be taken before the second day.
- F. Rules C and D may be set aside by affirmative vote of two-thirds of the delegates present and voting at the annual meeting. In this event, the resolution involved shall be referred to the Executive Committee for its recommendation. No action may be taken on the resolution itself until copies are in the hands of the delegates.

**(EXHIBIT G)**

**REPORT OF MINISTERIAL SALARIES COMMITTEE**

The Committee on Ministerial Salaries of the Southern Conference submits the following recommendations:

1. The minimum cash basic salary per year for ministers meeting the requirements for full ministerial standing in the Southern Conference and giving fulltime service to a congregation or parish should be \$5500.00.

2. Every congregation or parish should enroll its minister in the retirement plan of the United Church of Christ and should pay the full 11% dues. This is calculated by taking 11% of the total obtained by adding the basic cash salary to the housing allowance (or 15% of the salary as a parsonage allowance).

It should further make certain its pastor is enrolled in the United Church of Christ Group Life Insurance Plan and that the annual premium is paid by the church or parish (\$50.00 per year).

3. Every congregation or parish should enroll its pastor in the Southern Conference Group Medical-Hospital Insurance Plan and pay the full premium (Individual—\$77.28; One Parent and One Child—\$152.56; Family—\$204.00).

4. Every Congregation or parish should provide its pastor with an automobile allowance adequate to meet the actual expenses he incurs in carrying out his work in the parish. A minimum of 8c per mile or its equivalent is recommended. (The Internal Revenue Service permits 10c per mile for the first 15,000 miles and 7c per mile for additional miles).

5. Every congregation or parish should provide a fund to cover the professional expenses of its pastor, such as: attendance at denominational meetings and professional meetings; attendance at training and educational opportunities for ministers; the development of a professional library, etc.

6. Every congregation or parish should provide its pastor with an adequate parsonage or housing allowance.

In addition the pastor should be provided with an adequate allowance to cover the cost of utilities.

7. The committee strongly recommends that each church of the Conference provide a regular procedure for a timely annual review of ministerial salary provisions.

An example of the meaning of these recommendations translated into figures follows:

\$5500.00	Basic Cash Salary
696.00	Retirement (11% of \$6325 which is the base salary (\$5500) plus 15% for Parsonage value (\$825).
50.00	Group Life Insurance Premium
204.00	Group Hospital-Medical Insurance Plan Premium
1200.00	Automobile Allowance (15,000 miles at 8c per mile)
200.00	Professional Expenses
500.00	Utilities (Parsonage Provided)*

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\$8350.00 (Plus Parsonage) Total Support for Minister

\* If there is no parsonage the housing allowance should be sufficient to provide a house in keeping with the position of the church in the community.

Provision should be made for an annual vacation with pay for the minister. The minimum should be two weeks. The recommended vacation for ministers is one month.

The ministry is a profession. The minister should be paid in accordance with his education and professional experience. The minister must provide for his family and the education of his children. In addition, if he lives in a parsonage, he must have sufficient income to make provision for a home during retirement.

We call upon the churches of the Southern Conference to make provision for adequate financial support of our ministers.

HIGHER EDUCATION COMMITTEE REPORT

The ministry to students in the Southern Conference is carried on by campus pastors on our two church related college campuses, by ministers to students serving on private and state university campuses, and by ministers and laymen in churches located in College and university communities.

Campus pastors are at work at Elon and Catawba Colleges, at the University of North Carolina and Duke University and at North Carolina and A and T Colleges. These ministers have special training in serving the campus and in the opinion of the committee, are all making an outstanding contribution not only to the lives of students and faculty members, but to the total life of their respective campus communities.

The committee believes that by working unitedly and pooling resources with other denominational groups, a more vital and effective ministry is possible. We are working, therefore, wherever possible, on a co-operative basis.

In each of our ministries, the work is under the direction of a local board. The committee's responsibility is to appoint Board members and to make limited financial appropriations where the money is available through national and local sources. We meet regularly with the campus pastors, review their work, offer suggestions for improvement and are ever on the alert to discover ways of assisting them in the important work in which they are engaged.

REPORT ON ELON COLLEGE

by J. Earl Danieleley, President of the College

It is a pleasure to report briefly to you on some of the aspects of the work we are doing at Elon College. At the end of this month I will have completed eleven years as Elon's President. During that time I have had the opportunity of reporting to the churches many times and I have always counted it a privilege. You have supported and assisted us in many ways and we are grateful to you.

The enrollment at the College was 1454 last fall; it will be at least 1560 in September of this year. Last fall we had 700 students living in the dormitories and taking their meals in the dining hall. This fall we will have 1000 students living in the dormitories and eating in our two dining halls. The two new dormitories and the new dining hall being constructed on the north campus will make this increase in enrollment possible. Although we will have this large increase in capacity, the space is already filled and we have a waiting list of others who would be accepted for admission to the College if space were available.

Our Board of Trustees has planned and worked over the past several years so that we are now in a position to pay salaries that are comparable to those being earned by faculty members in other institutions of our type. For the coming fall we will have a net increase of **eight** earned doctor's degrees on our faculty—I can't remember a time in more than twenty-five years that I have known this College when that kind of advance in the educational level of the faculty has been made.

Our new library building is a source of great pride and satisfaction. Now that the shelving is being delivered and will soon be installed we will be able to use the building within two or three weeks. Few institutions have provided their students with a facility which will match this one in design, convenience, or adequacy. We are all so very grateful that this wonderful library building will soon be serving our students.

Many of you have read in the public press that we are engaged in a capital funds campaign called the E4 Fund. The motto from which the symbol E4 comes is Elon Expands its Educational Excellence. The first phase goal for the campaign is \$3,000,000. We have just announced that \$1,250,000 of this amount has been secured in gifts, pledges, and commitments.

I have been profoundly impressed in recent years with the large number of students who are flunking out of college—students who by every known standard are prepared to do college work but who, for some reason, just don't achieve the required level. Something must be done to stop this outrageous waste of human resources and poor use of time, talent, and resources. We are attacking the problem here at Elon with a new approach to guidance. Beginning this fall we will have three professionally trained guidance people on our staff working primarily with freshmen and sophomores. Our basic effort is to try to assist those students to do the work which they are plainly capable of doing. We must be certain that if they flunk out they have not had an assist from us . . . but to the contrary, that we have done everything possible to encourage them to do their best.

Another very interesting innovation here for the coming year is our new 4-1-4 academic calendar. We will complete one semester before the Christmas holidays, have a one-month term in January and early February, and then complete another semester by the end of May. During the one-month term the student will study one course intensively. This approach offers many interesting and exciting possibilities and we are looking forward to working on this plan with a great deal of enthusiasm.

And now a brief word on each of two of my chief concerns:

1. recruitment for the ministry—

Yesterday I spoke to you of my concern for the vitality of the local church and of my conviction that we must have more, many more, persons dedicating their lives to full-time Christian service. This is no passing fancy. This is a matter of utmost importance. We are prepared to work with such students, but the choice to respond to God's call is theirs and the responsibility of helping them to come here is, in part, yours.

2. a word about today's college student—

I hope that you don't believe most of what you read. It isn't that the public press does not report what it has seen. The problem is a matter of perspective. Those few students who are failing to be good citizens have had attention out of proportion to their number or their importance. So, whenever I have the opportunity, I take pleasure in saying that the overwhelming number of today's college students . . . and I know many of them personally . . . the overwhelming majority of them are serious young men and women whose character is good, whose motivation is well-founded, whose integrity is unquestioned, whose morality is above reproach, and whose sense of dedication and commitment is a source of satisfaction and pride.

To be sure, ours is a time of crisis. But it is an exciting time in which to live . . . a great time to be working with young people . . . and what a privilege it is to work with them on the campus of a Christian college. Thank you.

#### (EXHIBIT K)

#### REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE MINISTER

The Southern Conference is composed of 413 congregations with a total membership of 69,108. There was a net gain in membership of 505 over the previous year.

The current local expense of the congregations came to a total of \$2,387,794. Capital expenditures amounted to \$1,148,033, with a grand total for local expenses of 3,535,827. This was an increase of \$118,784 over 1966.

A total of \$373,750 was given to Basic Support and \$153,645 to other causes included in Our Christian World Mission. The total for Our Christian World Mission was \$527,395—an increase of \$51,339 over 1966. Gifts to other benevolences amounted to \$66,798, making a grand total for benevolences of \$594,193. In 1966 the total was \$526,871.

There are 325 ordained ministers in full standing in the Southern Conference. 209 serve as active pastors. 40 are in the retired category. 56 ministers are involved in denominational work, as missionaries, as military or institutional or campus chaplains, in educational work or in some other form of religious work. 20 are in business, a profession, or some other kind of work.

16 ministers of the conference have "Conference Ordination." There are 23 Licensed Ministers. 29 students in preparation for full time Christian service are "In Care of Association." There are 16 ministers of other denominations serving congregations in the Conference.

8 Directors of Christian Education serve in churches of the Conference. 7 persons are officially recognized in the category of "Lay Ministry."

Of the 413 churches 6 are inactive and 18 are part time supply situations.

338 churches with a membership of 60,718 have standing with the United Church of Christ.

75 churches with a membership of 8,390 have not yet voted to be a part of the United Church of Christ.

All of these figures are as of December 31, 1967.

**STEWARDSHIP, OCWM COMMITTEE REPORT**

With the continuing improvement in the organizational structure of the Southern Conference significant improvement in the support of Our Christian World Mission seems to be taking shape within the Conference.

We realize that bringing together a large number of people in committee from such distances as the extreme ends of the Conference involves a great deal of expense that might well be used in other needs of Christian Mission. More effective results could be accomplished by using a greater number of people closer to the local churches.

Stewardship and OCWM Committees have been set up in each of the newly formed Area Associations in North Carolina and the two acting associations in Virginia. These Committees met soon after being elected at the time the respective associations were organized and have been active in promoting Christian Stewardship in their own areas and in dealing with problems encountered by individual churches. We believe that their efforts have contributed materially to the increase in support of Our Christian World Mission in the Conference this year.

The Southern Conference committee met in Burlington October 31, 1967 to study and outline areas of work for consideration by the Association Committees. A new filmstrip produced by the Conference office entitled "Our Here and Now Mission" was reviewed and is recommended to local churches for use in their programs of Stewardship Education.

On April 25, 1968 the Chairmen of the Area Associations, the Conference Staff, and the Coordinator met in Burlington with Rev. Karlton Johnson, Regional Secretary of the Stewardship Council, to plan for the program of work for the year ahead. At this meeting, dates were set for two meetings by each Area Committee with specific assignments for each meeting. Enthusiasm for the work was apparent and a spirit of optimism among those involved with this area of our Mission lends encouragement to our task.

We submit the following recommendations:

1. That an active committee for Stewardship and OCWM be established in every church of the conference. Its task should be:

a. to support the Minister in encouraging a high level of Stewardship throughout the church.

b. to seek to involve more people in active concern for Mission.

c. to provide information concerning programs of Mission and opportunities for growth in Christian Mission. (Note: Pastors should make sure this committee has available the Stewardship Packets sent three times each year to the Minister).

2. That the principle of "A Stairway of Progress" (that of growing in percentage of giving for others to that we use for ourselves) be recognized as our guide to responsible Stewardship.

#### REPORT OF LAY LIFE AND WORK COMMITTEE

The Committee held only one meeting during the past year on September 23, 1967 to hear reports on activities and to make plans for the current year.

Since our meeting last year, the **Women's Summer Conference** was held at Catawba College from July 17 to 20, 1967. Mrs. Doris Isenhour of Hickory was Chairman. There were seventy women who registered full time and stayed on campus. An additional fifty-five day registrants made a total of 125 in attendance. Since it was a full month later than usual, it was felt that this could have affected the attendance. Dr. Warren Matthews of Norfolk was the bible study leader and Mrs. Leo Mahoney of Florida was the other leader. It was felt by those attending that it was a very successful conference.

The Summer Conference for this year is being held at Elon College from June 25-27, 1968 with Mrs. Wm. H. Duncan of Greensboro serving as Chairman. The theme will be "New Ways for New Days." The leaders will be Mrs. Barbara McCall and Reverend Myles Walburn. Mrs. McCall, a new member of the staff of the National Council for Lay Life and Work, will lead the study of the book "With Love to The Church." Reverend Walburn is a former U.C.C. missionary to Indonesia and will present the mission study on Southeast Asia.

A **Lay Theology Consultation** is being held on July 12-14, 1968 at Blowing Rock Conference Grounds. Mrs. Van Grimes of Conover is the Chairman. This is being sponsored jointly by the Education Committee of the Western Associ-

ation and the Committee for Lay Life and Work of the Southern Conference. Dr. John Casteel of the CLLW staff will be the leader. The dates were changed from early May to mid-July due to a desire to use the Blowing Rock facilities. It was felt that early May would be too cold.

A **Family Camping Weekend** was held at Johns River on September 15-17, 1967. Forty-five attended this informal outing. Mr. Bill Starr of Greensboro was chairman.

Twelve **Laity Workshops** were scheduled this year. One was held in Virginia on April 28. Ten were held in North Carolina on May 19 and one more is still to be held on June 30 in North Carolina.

A Laity Retreat was held at Franklinton Center March 29-31, 1968. The theme was "**Living our Faith in Today's World.**" Reverend Beverly Cosby of Lynchburg, Virginia and Mr. and Mrs. Louis Wilkins of Turkey and Greensboro, N. C. were leaders. There were 57 regular participants with another 50 visitors from the local community.

A national Lay Leaders Assembly was held in Chicago March 23-25, 1968. In addition to your committee coordinator, Mrs. Alexander, this meeting was attended by the President of the Churchwomen of the Southern Conference, Mrs. J. R. Kernodle, and by the President of the Churchmen's Fellowship of the Southern Conference, Mr. Dale Bennett. In addition, Reverend Larry Fisher, a member of our conference committee and also a member of the national council, also attended. Mr. Harold Isenberg of Salisbury, a new member of the Executive Council filling the unexpired term of Dr. Donald Dearborn, is the person between that group and the CLLW. We feel fortunate to have this relationship with someone in our conference. This group attending the Lay Leader's Assembly strongly recommends a retreat and training session for the Conference Committee for Lay Life and Work members. It was decided that plans should be delayed until the new members were elected at this meeting.

The Committee decided to recommend that any groups interested in a special project during the year be encouraged to support the United Church Retirement Home.

#### (EXHIBIT N)

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH EXTENSION

During the year 1967 the Southern Conference allocated \$15,413 of its funds and the Extension Division of the Board for Homeland Ministries allocated \$23, 447 — a total of \$38,860.00 — for church extension work within the boundaries of the Conference.

During the current year the Conference is designating \$19,625.00 and the Board for Homeland Ministries \$23,225.00 for church extension throughout the Conference—a total of \$42,850.00.

A primary function of the Church Extension Committee is to work with the aided fields that are being helped by these funds. Of particular interest is the fact that substantial aid is given this year to First Reformed UCC, Raleigh, N. C. and to St. Andrews UCC, Lexington, N. C. in order to make it possible for them to have competent full-time ministerial leadership and determine whether the potential for growth exists.

On recommendation of the Church Extension Committee the Board of Directors of the Conference has established the policy that no new work shall be undertaken by the Conference on a strictly denominational basis without first determining whether it can be initiated in cooperation with one or more other denominations. At the present time serious conversations are being held in Eastern Virginia about starting one or more new projects on an ecumenical basis. We hope these conversations will bear fruit.

The Committee has sought to be experimental and visionary in its outreach. It is helping to support the experimental Ministry to Young Adults in the Norfolk metropolitan area. This may be the first of more similar efforts of the churches working together to seek to reach persons who no longer are in regular contact with the institutional church.

With the Church Extension Division of the BHM the Committee is exploring the possibility of joining with two or three other denominations in supporting the program of the Lynchburg Christian Fellowship in Lynchburg, Va. This program is seeking to minister to people in need in the urban center—particularly children, young people and the aged.

As of December 31, 1967 there was \$3,198 in the Church Builders Club Fund. The results from the 1968 campaign are not complete. However, \$1,578.31 has been received in the Conference office as of May 15. The funds are used to help new projects in their initial building projects. We need the support of every member of the Southern Conference in order to make this financial assistance substantial enough to be really helpful to the local group. Envelopes are available for your contribution at this meeting if you have not already made one.

The Christian Missionary Association of the Eastern Virginia Conference Acting Association (SC) has been raising approximately \$5,000 per year in recent years to be applied to the indebtedness on the land of the Virginia Beach, Pembroke Manor UCC. This is particularly helpful in view of the fact the congregation is now involved in paying for its first building unit. The C.M.A. deserves our commendation for this worthy undertaking. The Eastern Virginia Acting Association has also made an appropriation of \$2,000 to help the local congregation with furnishings for the new facilities. This is the kind of cooperation that it needed to make new church projects meet the financial obligations that are involved.

It should also be noted that through the Church Extension Committee with funds made possible by the Mission Board of the Southern Convention several exploratory meetings have been held in cooperation with the UCC BHM (with representatives of other denominations involved) to discuss the future of small churches in small communities and the open country and the things they should be doing to make an effective witness.

**REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION**

During the year beginning in the Spring of 1967 and continuing through Spring 1968, the Christian Education Committee of The Southern Conference has been involved in familiar pursuits and new endeavors. The following overview will suggest some of these activities.

## CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

Vacation Church School Workshops continue to be scheduled across the Conference. In 1968, a reduction in the number of these workshops was made because of evaluations of the 1967 workshops by the sub-committee responsible for planning VCS. Eight were held: South Boston, Raleigh, Salisbury, Portsmouth, New Bern, Greensboro, Newton, and Burlington, during April and May, with 283 participants.

On November 18-19 a **Demonstration Workshop** for those working with primaries, lower juniors and juniors in church schools was held at St. Marks UCC, Burlington as a pilot project. The success of this workshop has encouraged the sub-committee to anticipate having similar demonstration workshops in Western North Carolina and Eastern Virginia in the Fall or Winter of 1968. Miss Louise Drew, national staff worker from Boston, shared in the leadership of this workshop. Between sixty and seventy registrants shared in these days of training.

In several areas of the Conference, notably Burlington, Virginia Beach, and Hickory/Newton, interest is increasing in **Day Camping** for children. This activity by local groups will receive attention from the sub-committee to (1) assist with resources and leadership training wherever possible, and (2) encourage other groups to try day camping on the basis of the experiences of those already carrying out this kind of program.

## YOUTH MINISTRY

Within the Youth Ministry concept is every activity and concern of the local church as we minister to and with junior high, middle high, and senior high young people. In our Conference, special work has been going on for nearly two years to bring together into an effective fellowship middle and senior high young people. There is now **The Southern Conference Youth Fellowship** at the Conference, Association, and District levels. Resource materials have been selected by the Conference Youth Board Commissioners and a packet for 1968-69 has been put together and made available for local youth fellowships to purchase (\$12.50). These resources are gathered to serve the ten emphases for 1968-69 chosen by the Youth Board (two for each commission). District training meetings have been and will continue to be held to help local leaders take fullest advantage of these new tools. **The Senior High Planning and Training Conference** (June 23-29, Moonelon Center) will focus on some of these resources and give help in their use locally. Local youth groups are urged to get in on what's going on by attending district meetings and training opportunities.

During November of 1967, five of our workers attended the **Confirmation Education Consultation** held at Notre Dame University (James Cress, Tom Hamilton, James Morrison, Robert Bew, Bill Willett) so that they could begin planning for leadership training with the new United Church Confirmation Education resources now available. To facilitate effective training opportunities, seventeen experimental situations were arranged with churches in our Conferences who agreed to try the new resources and share in evaluative meetings. These churches have largely completed their work with the materials and the evaluations have been carried on. We anticipate further planning looking toward opportunities for help to local churches seeking to use the resources.

**The Junior High Consultation**, held in Burlington in April, began seeking ways to increase the effectiveness of our ministries with junior highs in all of our churches. The Rev. Ralph Moore, staff worker in the Division of Christian Education from Philadelphia, led this Consultation. Only seven people participated but a good beginning was made. This area of work with young people is probably one of the least effectively carried out across the Conference, and the sub-committee is conscious of the need to actively serve associations and smaller areas as they try ministering to this age group. One suggestion, now in the process of preliminary planning, is for a Fall weekend for junior highs in retreat setting.

**The 1968 Youth Forum** at Elon College, June 23-30, promises to be a second fine experience for our young people. Dr. J. B. Rhine parapsychologist, will lead in the emphasis of ESP, one of the two themes for the weekend. Symposium members Dr. J. Earl Danieleley, Rev. G. Melvin Palmer, Dr. Howard G. Miller, with two others, will lead a presentation on Challenges to the Christian Faith, the other emphasis. Worship, discussion, dancing, and special interest activities are also planned.

For high school juniors and seniors interested in learning more about fulltime church-related **Christian Vocations**, the 1968 Vocations Retreat will be held at Moonelon, September 21-22. Leaders will include Rev. William Bell, campus minister at A&T University, Rev. Karlton Johnson, Southeast Regional Representative of the Stewardship Council and former missionary to Africa; Rev. John Harrison, pastor-elect of the United Church of Christ at Southern Pines; Rev. Sterling Whitener, professor at Catawba & Livingstone Colleges in Salisbury and former Social Worker in Hong Kong; Rev. S. Collins Kilburn, pastor of United Church in Raleigh.

Much more is happening with youth work in our Conference but space does not permit mention in detail of it all. In eastern Virginia, under the leadership of Mr. Jack Mallery, and in cooperation with the American Friends Service Committee, young people are carrying on a weekend work program in poverty areas interracially and interdenominationally. In Newton, North Carolina, under Miss June Grubb's leadership, an interracial and interdenominational youth choir is touring the area with their remarkably fine repertoire of music. A fine youth choir provided music for Dr. Ben Herbster's recent visit to eastern Virginia; this was under the leadership of Mrs. Evelyn Graham and had singers from both the white and Negro churches of our fellowship. Young people out of the United Church in Raleigh have gone to Franklinton Center at Bricks on two occasions to give sweat and time in work projects. So young people are doing things . . . and others, too, are very active.

#### ADULT MINISTRY

**The Christian Education Institute** at Franklinton Center in August centered on leadership education of adults and sought to illustrate various ways of working with adult classes. About twenty-five attended.

The annual **Sedalia Adult Education Sessions** were again held at the public high school of that community with emphasis on Bible Study among three denominations using uniform materials. The course was based on one of the new adult resources available this Fall.

The new resources for adult education will be available to local groups to supplement current United Church Curriculum and Uniform materials. Four kinds of teaching materials are offered: (1) a series of twelve paperback books dealing with a wide variety of subjects, (2) **Trends** magazine which will consider a contemporary social issue each month, (3) **Enquiry** magazine which is an up-dated form of the uniform lesson idea, and (4) United Church Curriculum courses. Workshop help will be provided in the use of these new resources.

### LEADERSHIP MINISTRIES

The big thing this year will be the **Christian Education Conference at Notre Dame University** from August 27-30. We are sending a busload to this meeting: half of those going on the bus have already been signed up. This Conference will provide new ideas, new techniques and new inspiration for our Christian education leadership. Local churches are encouraged to send one or two active leaders in educational mission to this outstanding event.

Rev. John Westerhoff, III, Editor of **Colloquy** magazine was our special leader for the 1967 **Christian Education Consultation** at Durham last Fall. He introduced the new resource of our denomination and gave us a look at directions and needs across the denomination in Christian education.

Two or three **Church School Conventions** continue to function in our Conference. The tendency seems to be toward leadership training of a practical nature rather than mass inspirational gatherings. Gradually these Conventions are taking their places alongside and in cooperation with Christian Education committees in the Conference.

Eastern Virginia maintained an active **monthly training school** during part of this year, seeking to serve local teachers and workers over a wide range of concerns. Area workshops in other sections of the Conference, sponsored by local ministerial groups and small groups of churches also contributed to the total effort at leadership training.

CEA leaders continue to man many of the training leadership positions in workshops and schools in our fellowship. **Christian Education Associates** are inclining toward broader interests and specializations in fields not previously involved in their work. Hopefully new members of this important part of our leadership work will supplement the fine job now being done and make increasing opportunities possible. Many of the CEA people plan to replenish their skills and update their knowledge at Notre Dame in August.

### SPECIALIZED MINISTRIES

**Camps and conferences** at the three Southern Conference sites are well on the way to another busy summer. This year there will be six junior age, five junior high, two middle high and one senior high camps and/or conferences for our young people. Adult leaders are still needed.

Over the past three years the three facilities have gradually been **co-ordinating** their camp programming and planning, first with training, then with promoting, and this year with registrations through one central office. September 30-October 1, at Franklinton Center, will mark a high point in coordinated efforts to improve our camp/conference program. This will be a

meeting for all persons involved in camp/conferences, committees responsible for the facilities involved, specialized ministry leaders, and staff persons concerned with this aspect of our work with young people. During these two days we shall evaluate present practices and patterns and look ahead to begin making decisions for the development and more effective administration of this program . **Dr. Edward Schlingman**, national Specialized Ministries leader, will be with us to guide us and give us help from his experience and insights into our situation.

**Audio-visual resources** increase in number and usage through our AV Library in Burlington. Listings are available and churches are encouraged to make use of these free helps in their teaching and leadership work.

### **FINALLY . . .**

There has been more, and much more, personal effort by Christian Education Committee members, than is indicated by words describing programs. The Conference Committees usually meet twice yearly; sub-committees meet more frequently to get the work done which is their responsibility. In cooperation with Association C. E. Committees, we are able to make a dent in the needs which prevail. If two wishes could be wished with some hope of their fulfillment, they would be these: first, that those to whom mail is sent (even mimeographed stuff!) read it and pass it on to those interested in its message, and second, that the local church realize the simple fact of church life that Christian education is not just Sunday School as usual, but involves the total educational mission of the church if the church is to become the witnessing, knowledgeable community of faith it as been called to be.

#### **REPORT OF HEALTH AND WELFARE COMMITTEE**

Your coordinator along with The Rev. Dr. W. W. Snyder, Mrs. W. W. Snyder, and Mr. Howard Regan, attended the annual meeting of the Council for Health and Welfare Services of the United Church of Christ held in Cleveland, Ohio, January 15-19, 1968.

Mr. David A. Johnson of Evansville, Indiana, was elected President to succeed Dr. Walstein Snyder. Rev. H. Wayne Peck of Pleasant Hill, Tennessee, was elected a member of the Executive Committee to represent services to the aging.

Information from the Council Office of Dr. Lee Rockwell indicates that 1967 was a good year. "Service to 585,123 people at an operating expenses of \$72,543,691 in facilities valued at \$197,542,459 identifies Health and Welfare as one of the major enterprises of the United Church of Christ.

Southern Conference showed an increase in support of related and unrelated agencies. Total for 1966 was \$49,704, and for 1967, \$52,392, an increase of \$2,688. This increase indicates continued interest and support. The agencies continue to receive a major portion of their support, however, from State and Federal funds.

Literature and resources on the Division on Health and Welfare Services may be secured from your coordinator or ordered from the several sources listed in the Directory of Literature and Resource Material. Some literature and materials are also available from the Conference Office in Burlington.

The Committee did not meet during the year. Your Coordinator met with the Board of Directors of Nazareth Children's Home and Elon Home for Children. Two mailings of materials of general interest were sent from the Conference Office to ministers. Nazareth Children's Home, Elon Home for Children, and United Church Retirement Home, Inc. kept you informed through literature and visits by administrators and executive secretaries. Your coordinator also spoke in churches during the year in behalf of Health and Welfare Services.

Although we continue to be loyal to our established institutions, we are concerned that we in the local churches do not neglect those in our communities who are not in institutions. There are widows and widowers, and high school drop-outs, and many others in our neighborhoods to whom the church must minister. Health and Welfare Services must include those who need the ministry of the Church even though they are not residents of our institutions.

#### THE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS:

1. That each local church and related organization continue to give liberal support to our established Health and Welfare agencies.
2. That each local church and related organization continue to give liberal support toward the establishment of The United Church Retirement Home, Inc.
3. That each local church establish a Committee on Health and Welfare Services and charge the Committee with the responsibility of securing information on health and welfare agencies and services available to the citizens of their community, through our Conference and The United Church of Christ.

#### REPORT FOR THE ELON HOME FOR CHILDREN

This past winter the Elon Home for Children had in group care on the campus 72 children. There were 9 in Foster Care. In our Day Care program, there were 30 enrolled. In Higher Education, we had 3: all 3 were enrolled at Elon College.

Some 15 children, including 8 seniors, will leave our care this month. We already have more requests for group care than we can fill. We are hopeful that we can find more foster homes so that we can receive more into care. We have children right now who could go into foster care if we had the homes. This would leave vacancies in group care for children that we need to receive into this service.

Four of our seniors will be continuing their education. One will be going to East Carolina University, 3 will be going to the Technical Institute of Alamance. Three will be accepting employment in the area, 2 in Burlington and 1 in Greensboro. The other one will go into service.

During the past year, Mr. Ralph Robinson joined our staff as Director of Social Services. He replaced Mr. John Biggerstaff who accepted a position in Savannah, Georgia. Also in the last month another young man joined our staff as Director of Child Care Workers. He is Mr. Robert Stogner. We were pleased to have join our staff this June, Miss Yasuko Nakamichi from Japan. She came to us by way of the Volunteer Service Center in Pottstown, Pennsylvania. She is a member of our Day Care staff and will be with us for one year.

We were pleased to have again this year 2 student caseworkers from the School of Social Work at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. This next year we will have 2 in the fall and 2 in the spring. These students are under the supervision of Mr. Ralph Robinson. We are also pleased that we will be a part of the pilot project for training child care workers. This is sponsored by the School of Social Work at Chapel Hill, University of North Carolina, and the Duke Endowment. Mr. Stogner, Mrs. Bertha Phillips, one of our housemothers, and myself as Executive Director will participate in this program in the next year. This is in preparation of having a student houseparent on our campus, as we have had in the past student caseworkers.

I think the outstanding thing that we did this year was to begin having weekly staffing sessions of various children on our campus. Each Monday afternoon we would have 2 staffing sessions. If there was more than one child from the family on our campus, the entire number would be staffed. We were pleased to have in attendance at the staffing sessions the psychiatrist from our local Mental Health Clinic as well as the psychologist for most sessions. Also in attendance was a representative from the placing agency and either parent if they were living and could come. From the Home would be the housemother, the caseworker, and farm and maintenance manager if he was involved, also the Director of Social Service as well as the Executive Director. We have seen more positive results from this effort than anything we have tried at the Home since we have been here. As a direct result of these staffings, we have 2 children who were placed back in their homes as well as 4 children placed in foster care. There were other positive results on our campus that came indirectly from these staffings.

I'm sure that all of you have heard about the sizeable bequest that came to our Home in the past year. This will enable us to build additional facilities that we need. It will enable us to build without asking for a Capital Improvements Campaign in the churches. We will also now have an endowment that can be of help to us. Until this time we have not had any endowment to be of any substantial help.

We are grateful to the churches for the support we receive. In the past fiscal year we received 22% of our budget from church related sources. The remainder came from individuals, business and industry. Last year cost per child per day was \$7.12 at our Home. This amounts to \$2,593.80 per child per year. This year our budget will be in excess of \$200,000. When you try to offer quality service to those in your care, it costs. This is what we are trying to do as a multiple agency—in group care, foster care, day care, and higher education.

## NAZARETH CHILDREN'S HOME REPORT

Route 2, Box 48 — Rockwell, N. C.

### Report To Southern Conference:

I could repeat the first paragraph of the report of former Superintendent Aubrey Hedrick one year ago to say that my report comes from limited experience as Superintendent of Nazareth Children's Home and the same amount of experience in child care work. Mrs. Regan, who doubles as my secretary, and I have been kept very busy these first five months learning the many responsibilities of the office.

The Home continues to operate under supervision of a Board of Managers elected partly by Southern Conference and part by the Board itself. The Conference Minister, Area Associate Minister, and Health and Welfare Committee chairman serve as ex-officio members. The full board meets quarterly in regular session and the executive committee meets on call by the chairman. Considerable physical property improvements have been made during the past year and we continue to work toward maintaining and improving facilities and staff to more adequately meet the needs of the children who come to us.

A major construction job has been tentatively approved with a late summer 1968 date possible for actual construction to begin. Four new buildings will replace the present Payne Building. These are two girls cottages, a new dining hall and kitchen, and an administration building. The new buildings will not increase our facilities so far as the number of children we can house but will allow us to house two age groups of girls in separate buildings. The administration building will house offices, conference room and staff living quarters.

There continues to be considerable turn over in enrollment at the home. This results from the fact that most of our children come from broken homes.

When a family is able to reestablish a stable home situation suitable to us and the agency who placed the child we are happy to have the children return home. Seven children returned to their homes after the close of public school one week ago leaving present enrollment at 53.

Many children come to us needing special and individual attention in education, having been kept out of school or allowed frequent absences by parents. To assist them in this area we have a tutoring service during the school year, and are continuing remedial reading and arithmetic during two months of the summer. An industrial arts instructor will assist us in a program of arts and crafts for the same period this summer. Not all of our children are deficient in education however. We have a number of A and B honor roll students.

The farm continues to operate at little cost to the home and my personal feeling is that the profits in work experience for the boys make it a most valuable asset to our total program.

Pastor Edwin Nagle makes regular campus visits and is important to the spiritual life of the home. He is pastor of Lyerly Memorial where we attend Church and Sunday School. The children participate in other programs at the church.

With plans for enlarged facilities, rising cost of operations, and a desire to do a larger ministry to our homeless children the Board of Managers wishes to challenge the churches to raise the basis of support to the home to three dollars per member.

The Board wishes to express its appreciation for the continued liberal support of our work.

**STAFF FUNCTIONS**

(Policy adopted by the Board of Directors on March 12, 1968)

**A. Conference Minister**

The Conference Minister shall perform the duties and functions assigned to him in Article V, Section 3 of the By-Laws of the Southern Conference and such other responsibilities as may be assigned to him by the Board of Directors and/or the Conference.

**B. Conference Field Associate**

1. He shall carry out his responsibilities under the direction of the Conference Minister and the Board of Directors.

2. He shall attend the meetings of the Board of Directors and the Conference.

3. He shall carry committee responsibilities as assigned to him by the Conference Minister and/or the Board of Directors.

4. He shall have special responsibility for working with the churches and ministers of the former Convention of the South to help bring them into the total life of the Conference and, in particular, to assist them in the development of stronger programs of stewardship and the development of leadership. These functions shall be carried out in cooperation with the Area Ministers.

5. He shall assist the Conference Minister in the general administration and promotion of the Conference program.

### C. Area Ministers

1. The Area Ministers shall carry out their responsibilities under the direction of the Conference Minister and the Board of Directors.

2. They shall attend the meetings of the Board of Directors and the Conference.

3. They shall carry committee responsibilities at the Conference level as assigned to them by the Conference Minister and/or the Board of Directors.

4. They shall be members ex-officio of the standing and special committees of the Association(s) in their respective areas.

5. They shall be ministers to the ministers and churches of the Associations in their respective areas and shall have general responsibility for the administration and promotion of the Conference program in their respective areas. To this end they are encouraged to exercise personal initiative and creative leadership in respect to the particular Associations they serve. By a strong ministry of teaching, persuasion and prophetic leadership they shall seek to develop within the Associations a philosophy and spirit reflecting the philosophy and spirit of the United Church of Christ.

6. They shall be liaisons between the Associations in their respective areas and the Conference and to the ecumenical bodies and programs in their respective areas.

7. In cooperation with the Conference Minister, and maintaining close contact with the Personnel Records Office of the United Church of Christ, they shall assist churches in filling pastoral vacancies and ministers who desire a change. They shall report all pulpit vacancies and ministerial changes in their respective areas promptly to the Conference Minister.

### D. Minister of Christian Education

1. The Minister of Christian Education shall carry out his responsibilities under the direction of the Conference minister and the Board of Directors.

2. He shall attend the meetings of the Board of Directors and the Conference.

3. He shall be the coordinator of the Committee on Christian Education and shall have staff responsibility for the Association Committees on Christian Education.

4. He shall have general responsibility for the total program of Christian Education of the Conference.

5. He shall carry such additional committee responsibilities and other duties as may be assigned him by the Conference Minister and/or the Board of Directors.

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**MORNING SESSION**

The organizational meeting of the Western North Carolina Association of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ was called to order in the Chapel of Catawba College, Salisbury, N. C. at 10:10 A.M., Tuesday, October 24, 1967, by Dr. Banks J. Peeler, chairman of the steering committee which had been appointed by the Southern Conference.

Devotions were led by Rev. George Gay, Jr., and included the hymn "God of Grace and God of Glory," responsive reading of I Corinthians 13, and prayer.

Welcome was given by Dr. Donald C. Dearborn, president of Catawba College.

Chairman Peeler requested all delegates to come to the "Bar of the House."

Rev. Edwin Alcorn stated that a quorum was present representing the majority of the churches in Acting Associations which had voted to become a part of the Western North Carolina Association.

Chairman Peeler stated the purpose of the meeting to be the formation of the Western North Carolina Association of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ.

Conference Minister James H. Lightbourne, Jr. reported that all the Acting Associations within the geographical bounds of the proposed Western North Carolina Association had voted to become a part of it except the North Carolina Christian Conference. Attorney John D. Xanthos stated that all requirements had been met and that the Western North Carolina Association could legally organize.

VOTED: To adopt the agenda as presented by the Steering Committee.

VOTED: To adopt the Working Rules proposed for the organization of the Western North Carolina Association. (Attached)

Rev. G. Melvin Palmer, first president of the Southern Conference, presented the Constitution and By-Laws, telling how they came to be and giving the basic ideas.

VOTED: To adopt the Constitution and By-Laws item by item.

Mr. Palmer then proceeded to read them and preside during the discussion and voting on each item.

There being no changes in the CONSTITUTION, it was

VOTED: To adopt the Constitution as read.

The BY-LAWS were then considered item by item and votes taken on sections indicated:

**Article I. Section 2. Paragraph a** was amended as follows:

VOTED: To insert "and Directors of Christian Education certified by the Division of Christian Education of the United Church of Christ" following "The voting membership of the Association consists of the ordained and licensed ministers holding standing in the Association."

**Article III. Section 5.** was amended as follows:

VOTED: To substitute the word "health" for the word "sickness" in line two.

**Article V. Section 3** was amended as follows:

VOTED: To delete "eligible for re-election but shall not serve more than two full terms" and substitute "shall not succeed themselves."

At 11:50 the Order of the Day was called. Rev. A. W. Hedrick presented the report of the Nominating Committee.

VOTED: To receive the report of the Nominating Committee, with nominations from the floor and the final vote to be in the afternoon session.

Prayer including grace for lunch was offered by Mr. Ira L. McDowell.

Lunch was served in the Catawba Cafeteria.

### AFTERNOON SESSION

Organ music by Gilbert Perisoni, professor of music at Catawba College, preceded the call to order at 1:30 P.M. by Chairman Peeler.

Hymn "Take Thou, Our Minds, Dear Christ" and prayer were led by Rev. Thomas Madren.

Report of the registration showed a total of 237 persons present, of whom 83 were ministers, 107 lay delegates, and 47 visitors.

The report of the Nominating Committee was presented for final consideration.

Tellers were announced by Chairman Peeler.

VOTED: To close nominations.

Ballots were distributed and collected by the tellers.

Mr. Palmer resumed leadership of the discussion and vote on the BY-LAWS. The remainder of the By-Laws were agreed to by common consent.

VOTED: To amend Article V. Section 2, by deleting the word "its" and adding this sentence at the end of the paragraph: "It shall submit two or more names for each office and for members of the Executive Committee."

The Chairman resumed the chair and it was

VOTED: To adopt the Constitution and By-Laws as amended.

The Chairman announced that the Western North Carolina Association is now duly constituted.

VOTED: That all actions taken at this meeting prior to adoption of the Constitution and By-Laws be ratified and approved and confirmed.

Installation of officers and executive committee and the closing devotional service were conducted by Dr. J. H. Lightbourne, Jr.

The meeting adjourned at 3:30 P.M.

## MINUTES

### ORGANIZATIONAL MEETING OF THE EASTERN NORTH CAROLINA ASSOCIATION OF THE SOUTHERN CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST, UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST, DURHAM, N. C.

OCTOBER 25, 1967

The Organizational Meeting of the Eastern North Carolina Association of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, was called to order by the Moderator, the Rev. Lowell A. Smoot, October 25, 1967, at 10:00 A.M., at the United Church of Christ, Durham, North Carolina. Mr. Smoot led the group in the singing of the Hymn, "O Worship The King." The Rev. Dr. Banks J. Peeler led in prayer. The Rev. Richard L. Jackson, Host Pastor, welcomed the group to the new church building.

Mr. Smoot read a letter from the Rev. Dr. Clyde L. Fields, Eastern North Carolina Area Minister, who could not attend the meeting due to illness. (Exhibit A). Mr. Smoot announced that the Rev. James W. Morrison, Conference Field Associate, could not attend the meeting due to the death of his brother in New York.

Mr. Smoot declared that a quorum was present and that the meeting would proceed. Mr. Smoot stated that the Purpose of the Meeting was to organize into a new body, The Eastern North Carolina Association of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ. The Constitution of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ provides for this re-organization (Article V—Paragraph 5). Meetings have been held with the Acting Association presiding officers and representatives to form the new Association. The following actions were taken: 1—That New Associations were to be formed in accordance with the Constitution of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ (Article V—Paragraph 5). 2—That New Associations should be organized in North Carolina in the Fall of 1967. 3—That the Proposed Constitution and By-Laws be presented for study. 4—The Board of Directors of the Southern Conference approved the plan. 5—That the Acting Associations of the Southern Conference were asked to consider by the Fall of 1967 the acceptance of these proposals in principle. Each Acting Association acted in accordance with these actions in principle, and this organizational meeting was officially called. Therefore, we are meeting today, October 25, 1967, to officially organize the Eastern North Carolina Association of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ.

Mr. John Xanthos, Attorney, stated that the Charter (Constitution) of this Association is to be filed in the Office of the Secretary of State in Raleigh this year. We would hope that all Acting Associations in this geographical area will join this Association. Those who have not voted will be in a position to join when they have taken this official vote, then the proper papers will be filed in the Office of the Secretary of State.

The Printed Program was approved as the Agenda for the day.

The Rev. Dr. James H. Lightbourne, Jr., Conference Minister, announced that the Eastern North Carolina, North Carolina and Virginia, Western North Carolina, Southern Synod, Lincoln and North Carolina State Acting Associ-

ations have voted to organize the Eastern North Carolina Association of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ. North Carolina Christian Acting Association has voted to postpone its vote until after this meeting and then it will meet again to act. Southern District Acting Association has voted to leave the action in the hands of the Executive Committee. The Eastern Atlantic Acting Association will meet next week.

Mr. Lightbourne stated that in accordance with the Constitution of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ (Article IV—Paragraph 2) that the churches and ministers of Acting Associations who have not become a part of the Association would be given the opportunity to become a part of the Association. The question of "Congregational Christian Standing Only" was clarified that churches and ministers not voting to become a part of the United Church of Christ would be given the same status as they held with their previous organization.

Mr. Robert Baxter presented the Proposed Constitution of the Eastern North Carolina Association of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ paragraph by paragraph. Opportunity was given for discussion but if no question was asked, he proceeded to the following paragraph.

The Proposed Constitution of the Eastern North Carolina Association of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ was adopted as amended:

That the additional phrase, "and to work for the increase of social justice and peace in God's world," be added to Article IV—Paragraph 4.

The Rev. Richard L. Jackson, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the preliminary report of the Nominating Committee. **Voted** to accept the Report of the Nominating Committee, to be acted upon in the afternoon session.

The Rev. F. A. Hargett, Sr., led in the Grace for the noon meal. The meeting adjourned for lunch to reconvene at 1:30 P.M.

The afternoon session was opened with the call to order by the Moderator. The Rev. Arthur R. Detwiler led in the singing of the Hymn, "God Of Grace And God Of Glory," and a prayer.

The Rev. Richard L. Jackson, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, distributed the ballots for the Election of the Officers and the Executive Committee.

There being no nominations from the floor, it was moved and voted that the Committees be elected by acclamation.

The By-Laws of the Eastern North Carolina Association of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ were adopted as amended:

A question was raised about the number of delegates from congregations to the Association Meeting. This question was referred to the Executive Committee to report at the next meeting. (Article I, Paragraph 4, Section 3.)

The word, "sickness," was changed to "health" in Article III, Section 5.

The word, "consecutive," was inserted before "full-terms" in Article V, Section 3, Paragraph 3.

Requests that the Bethel and Concord Churches in Caswell County be shifted from the South Boston District to the Burlington District (Article IX, Section 2, Paragraphs 1 and 2). It was noted that the number of churches would need to be changed in accordance with the change of churches from one district to another. (Churches were asked to notify the Conference Office if any church had been left out, through error, or if any change in County should be made.) Permission was given to make these changes as necessary.

Mrs. J. L. Levens announced the organizational meeting for the Eastern North Carolina Area of Church Women of the Southern Conference to be held November 9, 1967, at the Durham United Church of Christ.

Mr. Henry Kennedy, Jr., Coordinator of the Stewardship and OCWM Committee of the Southern Conference, presented the OCWM Goals for 1968.

Mr. Kennedy stated recommendations that the Committee made to the Southern Conference:

1—That local churches make use of more of the materials available from the Stewardship Council and the Southern Conference to help in a program of local stewardship.

2—That local churches adopt a practice of remitting OCWM payments on a systematic monthly basis.

The Budget of \$3,500.00 was adopted. (Exhibit B). The Per Capita Dues of twenty-five cents per member were adopted.

The Secretary was instructed to send a letter of greetings to the Rev. Dr. Clyde L. Fields expressing regret that he could not attend the organizational meeting due to illness and expressing the hope of speedy recovery. The Secretary was instructed to write the Rev. James W. Morrison and express sympathy that he could not attend the organizational meeting due to the death of his brother.

**PRESENTS THE FOLLOWING REPORT**

**1. Previously Adopted:**

The Name of the Organization shall be The Church Women of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ.

**2. Previously Adopted:**

Purpose: In cooperation with the Committee for Lay Life and Work of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, the purpose of this Organization shall be to increase, develop and co-ordinate the activities and participation of lay women in the church as a means of witnessing effectively for Jesus Christ in all areas of life.

**3. The Officers shall be: President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer.**

**4. In 1968 the President and Secretary are to be elected for two years; the Vice Presidents and Treasurer for one year; thereafter all officers will be elected for a two-year term. Only the Treasurer will be eligible for two successive terms. New officers will begin their terms September 1.**

**5. The Treasurer shall have her books audited annually, and present a report to the annual Southern Conference meeting. She shall be bonded.**

**6. The President shall appoint a nominating committee, at least three months prior to the annual meeting, approved by the Executive Committee. They shall present a slate of officers, one nominee for each office, at the annual meeting. Further nominations may be made from the floor, providing the consent of the nominee has been obtained in advance.**

**7. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Officers and the Area Presidents.**

**8. Previously Adopted:**

This Organization shall meet at least annually—the time and place to be set by the Executive Committee.

**9. Previously Adopted:**

Each Church shall be entitled to one voting delegate to the annual meeting or special meetings of this Organization. Churches may send additional non-voting representatives.

10. **Previously Adopted:**

These Working Rules may be amended at any regular meeting by 2/3 vote of delegates present and voting.

### Report of Mrs. W. M. Alexander

#### Coordinator for the Conference Committee on Lay Life and Work

Mrs. Kernodle, members of the Churchwomen of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ:

It is a pleasure for me to bring you greetings from the Committee for Lay Life and Work. As you know, this is the Conference-wide planning committee for Lay Activities of both men and women's groups. The President of this women's organization and the comparable Churchmen's Fellowship are members of this Committee as are the Area Presidents. In addition there are laymen, laywomen and ministers from each administrative area elected to serve on this committee. The Committee is charged with providing opportunities for leadership training and joint planning on a Conference-wide basis. Most of the activities are carried out by sub-committees of which this group is an important one. Some activities are carried on jointly with other committees of the Conference. The one which is upper-most in my mind at the moment is the Lay Theology Consultation being planned for July 12-14 at Blowing Rock and sponsored jointly by Lay Life and Work and the Education Committee of the Western N. C. Association. Mrs. Van Grimes is Chairman. Dr. John Casteel—whom many of you remember from Summer Conference about three years ago—will be the national staff member serving as leader. This is open to men, women or couples from anywhere in the Conference. If you would like to participate and have not been contacted by your minister or by letter from Mrs. Grimes, please contact her. I am not sure whether there is a full registration yet or not.

Later in this program, Mrs. Duncan will tell you about the Summer Conference to be held here at Elon, June 25-27.

At our Luncheon Meeting today, Dr. Hart Helmich, the new Executive of the Council for Lay Life and Work will speak to you. As a result of requests from the Conferences and Areas, some changes are being implemented at the National level to help us meet the pressures and needs of the changing times in which we live. As I understand it, an effort will be made to provide program materials and suggestions for a variety of churches of different size and different needs. I will let him tell you about this rather than being guilty of mis-representing the facts.

The last thing I want to mention is the Lay Leaders Assembly held in March in Chicago. Several from our Conference had the privilege of attending—your President, Mrs. Kernodle, Mr. Dale Bennett, President of the Churchmen's Fellowship, Rev. Larry Fisher who is a member of the National Council for Lay Life and Work, Mr. Harold Isenberg of Salisbury who has been appointed to replace the late Dr. Donald Dearborn on the United Church of Christ Executive Board and has been assigned as liaison to the Council for Lay Life and Work, Mrs. F. C. Lester as a National Staff member and myself. This was an interesting meeting and your Southern Conference delegation decided that we wanted a retreat as soon as possible to serve as orientation for newly elected members at this Conference and to provide more training for the entire Committee.

I want to also mention one other thing from the Lay Assembly. Mr. John Kernodle, Jr., the son of our President, has been appointed to the Council to fill an unexpired term and to give some representation from the younger generation on the Board. He was chosen as one of the four nominees recommended by the Assembly to the 1969 Synod as a continuing member of this Board. We are very proud to have this young man, who has been such an active churchman in our Conference, on the Council.

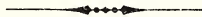

The Rev. Dr. James H. Lightbourne, Jr., conference minister, then reported to the Conference, calling attention to particular matters of basic concern. (These remarks were printed in the July 1969 issue of **The Southern Conference News.**)

That the report of the Conference Minister be received with approval and commendation for his outstanding leadership.

The report of the Nominating Committee was presented by the Rev. H. Winfred Bray, chairman.

**Voted: 4, SC '69**

That the report of the Nominating Committee be received and the names be placed in nomination as indicated.

The Rev. Charles W. Bell was nominated from the floor for membership on the Board of Directors for a two year term from the Eastern North Carolina Area.

**Voted: 5, SC '69**

That nominations be closed and that the elections take place as indicated on the agenda.

The Conference Minister then introduced the Rev. Dr. Ben M. Herbster, president of the United Church of Christ, who addressed the Conference on the present state of the church.

**Voted: 6, SC '69**

To express particular appreciation to Dr. Herbster for his timely remarks and to request that the addresses of both Dr. Herbster and Dr. Lightbourne be printed in **The Southern Conference News**.

The delegates and visitors were then invited to attend the group meeting of their choice as follows:

At 5:00 p.m. the elections were held. The conference then recessed for the evening meal.

#### **TUESDAY NIGHT — April 22**

A hymn sing and the Conference Service of Worship were held on Tuesday night beginning at 7:30 p.m. Mr. David Sanford, choir director of the Fellowship United Church of Christ, Portsmouth, Virginia, led the singing of the hymns. The Rev. Daniel W. Jones, Reidsville, N. C., was the pianist for the hymn sing and service. Special music for the service and for the fellowship period that followed was provided by the Bell Canto Chorus of Chesapeake.

Liturgists for the service were the Rev. James H. Lightbourne, Jr. and the Rev. L. Bill Simmons of the conference staff. The sermon was delivered by the Rev. James R. Johnson, Jr., pastor of the Fellowship United Church of Christ, Portsmouth, Va.

Following the worship service an informal period of fellowship was observed. Refreshments were served by ladies of the churches of the area.

**WEDNESDAY — April 23**

The Conference was called to order at 9:00 a.m. by President Roy E. Leinbach, Jr. Mr. King S. Bishop led the hymn and the morning prayer.

It was then announced that the following were elected the officers of the conference:

The Rev. Richard N. Rinker, Minister of Christian Education and Coordinator of the Christian Education Committee presented the report of the committee. Mr. Rinker also presented Charles Shockley, president of the Southern Conference Youth Fellowship (SCYF), who told the Conference of the work of the youth organization.

**Voted: 7, SC '69**

To adopt the Report of the Committee on Christian Education (Exhibit A)

The report of the Committee on Christian Social Action was presented by the Rev. James D. Riddle, coordinator. As a part of the presentation the coordinator introduced Mr. William Land of the national staff of the United Church Committee for Racial Justice. Mr. Land discussed projects of the committee within the area of the Southern Conference.

To adopt the report of the Committee on Christian Social Action (Exhibit B).

The Rev. G. Harold Myers, coordinator, presented the report of the Church Extension Committee.

**Voted: 9, SC '69**

To adopt the report of the Church Extension Committee. (Exhibit C)

The Rev. Hartland H. Helmich, executive director of the Council for Lay Life and Work, and the Rev. Leon A. Dickinson, Jr., secretary for chaplains — religion and health of the Council for Church and Ministry, led a panel discussion on the general theme of "The Laity and the Clergy." Southern Conference participants included Mrs. William Alexander, Mrs. Thomas Hamilton, Dale Bennett and King Bishop representing the laity, and the Rev. George Dillinger, the Rev. Richard L. Jackson, the Rev. Zanda P. Jenkins, the Rev. James W. Morrison and the Rev. W. Millard Stevens representing the ministry.

The 1968 Financial Statement was presented by the Conference Minister due to the unavoidable absence of the treasurer, Walter L. Cooper.

**Voted: 10, SC '69**

To receive the 1968 Financial Statement and refer it to the auditor. (Exhibit D).

John D. Xanthos presented the Proposed 1969 Budget as recommended to the annual meeting by the Board of Directors.

**Voted: 11, SC '69**

To adopt the 1969 Budget as presented. (Exhibit E)

The Rev. Joseph M. Copeland addressed the Conference on the concerns of the Ministers for Racial and Social Justice. He then presented a series of resolutions presented by that group for action.

It was moved and seconded that the resolutions be adopted.

An amendment was then moved and seconded that item # 7 become #8 and that the new # 7 read as follows:

"That the Southern Conference send to all its member churches a letter containing information regarding the plans for the "City of Hope and Opportunity" in North Carolina and urge the churches and their members to study carefully these plans and consider their individual and collective Christian responsibility in respect to this project."

The conference then recessed for lunch.

### **WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON**

President Roy E. Leinbach called the Conference to order at 1:45 p.m. Mrs. Van D. Grimes led the hymn and prayer.

The secretary called attention to the report of the Committee on Church and Ministry in the absence of the coordinator, the Rev. George Gay, Jr., Chaplain Carroll E. Bartholomew, Chaplain L. G. Brady and Chaplain Wade H. Curran, Jr. were recognized. All three are ministerial members of the Southern Conference.

The Rev. Van D. Grimes, coordinator, presented the report of the Committee on Higher Education—Health and Welfare.

The report of the Committee on Worship and Evangelism, the Rev. Billy Joe Leonard, coordinator, was presented.

The report of the Historical Committee, Dr. W. T. Scott, coordinator, was presented.

**Voted: 17, SC '69**

To adopt the report of the Historical Committee. (Exhibit J)

Mrs. William M. Alexander, coordinator, presented the report of the Committee on Lay Life and Work.

**Voted: 18, SC '69**

To adopt the report of the Lay Life and Work Committee. (Exhibit K)

The report of the Committee on Stewardship and Our Christian World Mission, Mrs. Eugene Amick, coordinator, was presented.

**Voted: 19, SC '69**

To adopt the report of the Committee on Stewardship and Our Christian World Mission. (Exhibit L)

The report of the Resolutions Committee was presented.

**Voted: 20, SC '69**

To adopt the report of the Resolutions Committee. (Exhibit M)

The Conference Minister then presented to Dr. Ben M. Herbster on behalf of the Southern Conference an inscribed silver plate in recognition of the service Dr. Herbster has rendered to the United Church of Christ as its first President. Dr. Herbster will retire in October of this year.

Dr. Herbster then conducted the Installation Service for the new officers.

The Rev. Roy E. Leinbach, Jr. presented the gavel to the newly installed president, the Rev. Zanda P. Jenkins, as the symbol of his office.

The Conference was adjourned by prayer to meet again on June 9-10, 1970 on the campus of Catawba College, Salisbury, North Carolina.

#### **EXHIBIT (A)**

##### **COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION**

It continues to be the purpose of Christian Education in our fellowship to be at the forefront in the development of more effective ways to respond to the growth needs of our constituency. This past year has meant evaluation and re-deployment, experimentation and continuing emphasis on the ever-present basic problems in educational mission.

The five ministries through which our work is carried on employ the efforts and time of the fifteen members of this committee and several others whose services are co-opted as needed. We have been involved in a wide variety of

activities, as will be seen in the following summary of the ministries.

## **CHILDREN'S MINISTRY**

**Vacation Church School** programs came under the close scrutiny of this sub-committee because of the lack of interest apparent in some areas. This year there will be fewer workshops providing training for leaders in local VCS programs, to be placed in areas where interest seems to require them.

The **Vacation Missionary School** plan may prove to be an alternative to VCS for our churches. At the present time, using the resources of Friendship Press, sub-committee members are at work writing lesson plans for a summer program emphasizing missionary education (Southeast Asia). Several churches have been invited to participate in this experimental venture to see how usable these materials are in this context. Leadership training will be provided for their teachers.

**Interdenominational** cooperation will be the rule whenever possible in leadership training programs. The Disciples of Christ and the U.P.U.S.A. have both indicated a willingness to share in joint training events in our area. For the U.P.U.S.A., for example, there could be curriculum workshops focusing on the newly revised children's resources of the United Church Curriculum to be used beginning in the Fall by the U.P.U.S.A.

**Day Camp** programs are catching on in our Conference. On the basis recent survey returns, at least a dozen churches share in day camp programs for their children, some carrying on individually and others in cooperation with other churches in this area.

The **Through-The-Week Curriculum** developed jointly by four major denominations is now off the presses and will begin seeing service in churches looking for this kind of flexible resource. When some of our leaders have had the opportunity to receive interpretive help for it, we shall endeavor to pass on further information and training as needed.

## **YOUTH MINISTRY**

The **Southern Conference Youth Fellowship (SCYF)**, while still finding itself as a new fellowship covering a varied assortment of conditions of youth work, has become a recognizable entity. For the past year and a half its Conference Board officers have labored hard to work out the kinks and minor problems associated with its evolvement. The Board is appreciative of the action of our Conference to allocate funds in the Conference budget in support of the SCYF program. Among their achievements has been the first Program Packet which has been obtained by more than sixty-five churches. This year's Packet will be slightly modified on the basis of reactions to the first one and will be more usable by local groups.

The **Youth/Adult Thing** held in Norfolk recently represents one effort to find new ways to meet the needs of local groups. This, in particular, was concerned with communications between adult leaders and youth. For five hours, one adult and two young people from each of eleven churches worked, discussed and relaxed together to open up better lines of communication. On the basis of their evaluations of the experience, similar events will be planned for the other two associations.

The Junior High Worshiping is another attempt to find new kinds of experiences to encourage young people to participate in creative ways in the witness of the church. In Burlington, junior highs and advisors from seven churches spent two and a half hours creating and using their own worship expressions. Again, because this seemed to have value, similar worshipings will be offered elsewhere in the Conference. Junior highs, incidentally, planned and carried out the work for this; there was very little adult "control."

The 1969 Youth Forum will be coming up at Catawba College June 20-22; its theme will be **Sights and Sounds for a Plugged-in Generation** and will concern participants with music, art and drama. A committee of SCYF is planning it.

Senior high, middle high and junior high conferences at the three camp sites promise to offer some real opportunities for Christian growth and understanding in areas of concern for young people. Interpersonal relationships, pressures, beliefs and life are but a few of the items on their agenda.

Confirmation Education resources are being used by a number of our churches; these are the new materials published last year by our denomination and introduced experimentally to twenty of our churches for evaluation and planning purposes. This is a program running for a year or two years, comprehensive and valuable as a preparational approach to church membership.

Through-The-Week Curriculum materials are now available for young people, produced by four major denominations. More about them as we come to learn how they can be used and what helps need to be given churches wishing to take advantage of them.

## ADULT MINISTRY

The word in adult education is the new series of resources, really three series to offer alternatives to all adult study groups, being done jointly by our denomination and the U.P.U.S.A. for use beginning this Fall. The **Decade Series** of paperbacks, **Enquiry** magazine, and **Trends** magazine will provide a solid variety from which to select sound teaching materials. In addition to these, the **Through-the-Week** resources are available for study by adults, too. All will replace the current UCC curriculum adult books which will no longer be available (except for past courses) after this summer.

A second effort needing attention is the encouragement of local churches to involve adults in small study groups which are not Sunday morning or laity organization-oriented. Such study groups can meet informally in homes or at the church building, but hard work needs to take place to bring to focus our faith on the contemporary issues causing turmoil and confusion. Such things as extremism, economic problems, urban crises, youth cultural protests, the relevancy of the church, all need our thoughtful study.

## SPECIALIZED MINISTRIES

The Camp/Conference Program is undergoing further modification in order to exercise the best possible stewardship of our resources, both human and material, and to secure the best leadership available on the basis of higher standards. All camps and conferences will be operating with similar standards

in 1969. Procedures for registration, promotion and leadership procurement have been unified.

The Rev. Dr. Edward L. Schlingman, national staff specialist in the development of camp facilities and program, met with leaders in our camp work to begin working at **reorganization of the camp program**. In this effort he will return to spend a week with us in May to conduct a thorough study of our existing facilities (Franklinton Center, Johns River Valley, Moonelon Center, and Blowing Rock Assembly Grounds) with the intent of making recommendations which will help us improve our stewardship of resources and personnel. Representatives of the four facilities will participate in the "tour" with him.

**Attendance at summer camps** remained fairly steady in total count last year, with increases at Johns River Valley and decreases at both Moonelon and Franklinton Center. This year, because of increased operating costs, rates for camp have increased (Moonelon and Johns River are \$27.50; Franklinton is \$23.00); it is hoped that in 1970 all rates will be the same. Hopefully it will be possible to secure scholarship help to enable young people to attend camp who would not otherwise be able to because of financial conditions at home or their church.

Of primary importance this year will be the increased need for **small group leaders** at camps. Because standards have been raised we will be under greater pressure to find mature adult leadership. Those working with junior or junior high camps must be at least 25 years old; those with middle and senior high conferences between 20-35. Local churches are urged to encourage their concerned adults to share a week at camp so that young people may come.

**Student Summer Service** work has been expanded to include one S.S.S. worker at each of the three camp facilities, in spite of the cessation of national financial subsidies for this program. These workers will be at least rising juniors in college; two of them need to be water safety specialists for JRV and MC. They receive \$400 each for ten weeks service.

The **Campus Ministry**, a newly acquired addition to the Christian Education portfolio, through a sub-committee has planned for the 1970 budget along lines similar to this year's with the possible addition of participation in a new endeavor at Norfolk State College. We are involved in work at A & T (Greensboro), Catawba (Salisbury), Elon (Elon College), Duke (Durham), North Carolina College (Durham), and UNC (Chapel Hill). Total budget is \$5,700 for 1970. A fellowship meeting has been planned for May 5-6 for sharing word about work being done among campus ministry leaders.

The **Audio-Visual Library**, under the capable eye of Miss Ruth Dunn, continues to serve our fellowship increasingly, with continuing addition of new filmstrips, recordings, and teaching pictures. Filmstrip projectors can also be purchased at discounts through this office. A list of available resources is available on request.

## **LEADERSHIP MINISTRIES**

The **National Conference at Notre Dame** last Fall was the big event for Christian Education leaders in our Conference. A busload of more than forty

people went in addition to several carloads all of which totalled fifty-five participants. Among them were CEA's, youth representatives from SCYF, and local church school workers.

A recent consultation held at Suffolk with leaders from the Eastern Virginia Negro churches helped establish some priorities for meeting their needs in Christian education. Among specific suggestions was the preparation of special teacher-training outlines for use by local churches during the course of a year. The Eastern Virginia C. E. Committee also reached a similar conclusion about this need and will help implement this plan.

**Through-the-Week Curriculum** interpretation sessions will be held in Philadelphia in April, and **Day School guidance** sessions will be held in Atlanta the same month — both shall have representatives from our Committee who will return with ideas for bringing our churches up-to-date on these programs.

**Christian Education Associates**, mainstays in our total program in the Conference, will have an opportunity to get their "batteries recharged" in the Fall when several days will be set aside with national and perhaps inter-denominational leadership for consideration of such things as sensitivity training, working with small churches, and developing skills for leading work in creative arts. This will also be a time for the introduction of potential new CEA's to the program.

The length of this report will suggest that things are indeed happening in Christian Education in our Conference. Members of the Committee work hard and long to see that this remains the case. Without their efforts much of what has been and will be offered would not be possible. It behooves all of us in our local churches to take full advantage of the many great opportunities for growth they will continue to provide.

#### **EXHIBIT (B)** **CHRISTIAN SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE**

(In the midst of the current year, the coordinator, the Rev. Collins Kilburn of Raleigh, who was elected at the annual meeting in 1968, had to resign. The Rev. James D. Riddle of The Community Church of Chapel Hill was appointed in his place.)

#### **I**

Of primary importance to the church during these times, both for its potential impact on the larger society and for its educational influence on our churches, is the "Crisis in the Nation" program sponsored by the General Synod. This program is designed to make available large sums of money for use on many fronts throughout our country, as determined by the Committee for Racial Justice. It is also designed to make available funds for local Conference Action. All churches, large, small, and in-between, are urged to plan a Fall Offering for "Crisis in the Nation." Even better, because of its longer lasting implications, is the suggestion that each church place in its regular budget an amount for "Crisis in the Nation" totaling from 1% to 5% of its regular budget.

Many of us are quick to criticize the Church for its inadequacies in such days as these, in which the church is called to live and witness. One way to be sure that the Church will be adequate, is to make sure that it has both staff and resources to meet the needs at the moment of need. More than this, it is important to equip the Church in order that it may point to the future as an enabler and not just a reflection of that new day.

## II

Another important area of concern for all of us is the quality of relationship which exists between our black and white members, ministers and churches. Though we are united, yet the sad truth is that we remain separated. Much needs to be done to ensure that our fellowship may be one and that it is united around the issues and problems which confront all of us.

No doubt some of our churches are past the point of simple pulpit exchanges or just choir concerts. We must confess, however, that there are some places even now where white and black members of the United Church of Christ cannot worship together. As is frequently true in ecumenical gatherings, perhaps we can find ourselves brothers better in those areas of "life and work" than in "faith and order." May we as southern churchmen therefore renew our dedication this year by finding additional ways of working together. May we, therefore, come to know each other because of our common commitment to justice and equity for all.

Many communities have found that a formally established Human Relations Council is one way of getting people to talk together about common problems. Certainly there continue to be school problems, housing problems and employment problems which United Churchmen of the Southern Conference, black and white, can gather around and together seek to solve. One brief word of caution; as black identity develops, and as the many contributions of Afro-Americans to our larger society become more commonly known, there will doubtless be occasions when white churchmen and citizens will need to follow the leadership of black churchmen and citizens along new and perhaps even painful pathways. Let us determine now that we will, for the establishment of justice and the creation of a better society for all men, walk any pathway and leave no stone unturned in a united effort.

## III

A third area of concern, which we would like to communicate to members of the Conference, is the work of the Defense Committee for the Rocky Mount Four. In October, 1968, four black teenage Rocky Mount girls were charged with the death of a grocer. One of them, Miss Marie Hill, was tried, convicted, and sentenced to die by electrocution on January 3rd, 1969. Her execution was stayed, and our national United Church of Christ Committee for Racial Justice, headed by the Rev. Charles Cobb, became interested in her case.

It may be hard for some of us to understand why the Committee for Racial Justice now did not contact either the Conference or our Committee before sending staff members to check on the situation. It needs to be clearly understood however, how many black people feel about the death penalty. A cursory review of State records indicates that many more black citizens have been executed for capital crimes than have white citizens. There might be many sociological rationalizations for that fact, but the reality remains that

the death penalty has certainly been applied more often against black people than white. For most of us the State of North Carolina is a pleasant place to live, It should, nevertheless, also be remembered that, viewed from the outside or by former Tar Heels now living in other states, the fact that we have the largest KU KLUX Klan organization of any southern state suggests the possibility that justice may not always be impartial.

One might view this case and the church's involvement in it as an indication of the Church's attitude toward capital punishment. One might try to understand it as a feeling that in this particular situation justice has not been served. From whatever view point, it can be stated quite simply that the Church ought to be and is concerned about human life, all human lives. It is concerned about justice for all. And it believes that a majority must always be doubly careful it does not violate the rights of the minority. At the present time, staff members from the Committee for Racial Justice now continue to manifest an interest in the case. A local law firm has been engaged to represent Miss Hill in the Courts. At least three of our conference staff members have continued contact with the Defense Committee, headed by one of our ministers, the Rev. Charles Samuels. Money for the defense fund is being received and contributions can be mailed to Box 167, Moncure, N. C. 27559. It is hoped that all of us will find ways to contribute to the Defense Fund. Expenses for the defense could total \$10,000.

#### IV

Your committee on Christian Social Action has attempted this year to try to understand better the society in which the church must work. It has begun the task of studying the problems manifest in each area of our Conference, as well as the available resources to meet problems in each area. This study will continue, and it will no doubt produce additional recommendations and programs of action. Our hope is to help every member to find ways of making churchmanship felt in the society in which he daily lives.

#### EXHIBIT (C)

##### THE CHURCH EXTENSION COMMITTEE

The Church Extension Committee, working in close relationship with the Church Extension Division of the United Church Board for Homeland Ministries, continues to give oversight to the aided fields of the Southern Conference and to explore the possibilities of new church starts and other mission projects in urban and rural areas.

During 1968 \$21,620.02 from conference funds was allocated by the committee for projects and the administration of the committee. This was matched by \$21,108.33 from the Board for Homeland Ministries — a total extension expenditure of \$42,728.35.

The Southern Conference has joined with the Board for Homeland Ministries and several other denominations to give financial support to the urban program of the Lynchburg Christian Fellowship, Lynchburg, Va.

Progress is being made in the effort to launch a new church start on an ecumenical basis in a development in Virginia Beach, Va.

Of particular interest is the fact that one of our previously aided fields, First Reformed UCC of Raleigh, has merged with United Church, Raleigh. The merged congregation plans to use the facilities of First Reformed UCC on Dixie Trail. It is believed the new congregation can grow and make a stronger impact than was possible for the two previous groups. The merger was the result of a period of exploration and consultation with the guidance of Dr. Clyde L. Fields, Eastern North Carolina Area Minister. The Rev. Collins Kilburn, pastor of United Church, will serve the new congregation.

The Eastern Virginia Christian Missionary Association again raised more than \$5,000 which was contributed to the support of Pembroke Manor UCC, Virginia Beach, Va., in its buiding program.

The Southern Conference Church Builders Club presented \$5,350.00 to the Ramseur UCC, Ramseur, N. C. to help in their building program. This young congregation has constructed a "church house" to be used for worship, education and fellowship activities. The Rev. Jimmy J. Norred is pastor.

It should be noted that generous contributions were made to Pilgrim UCC, Charlotte, and to the Ramseur, N. C. UCC from funds administered by the Mission Board of the former Southern Convention. In addition funds from this source were available to finance consultations on the future of churches in town and country situations.

It is anticipated that in the fall of 1969 the annual appeal for support of The Church Builders Club will be made. The funds raised will be used to help a new mission project, as was the case with Ramseur.

The Church Extension Committee will continue to seek faithfully and efficiently to discharge the important responsibilities assigned to it by the Southern Conference.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE SOUTHERN CONFERENCE MINISTERS  
FOR RACIAL AND SOCIAL JUSTICE

Whereas, the ministers for Racial and Social Justice of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ are committed to the realization of racial and social justice within the Southern Conference and within the larger society beyond the boundaries of the Conference; and

Whereas, the United Church of Christ has designated the Crisis in the Nation the number one priority for its 1969 emphasis for direct action; and

Whereas, the unresolving of the Crisis in the Nation will precipitate irreparable harm to persons, to the Conference, and to the Nation; and

Whereas, the Crisis in the Nation is the direct result of Christian persons noninvolvement with the spiritual and material needs of other persons of less fortunate circumstances; and

Whereas, churchmen everywhere are being called upon to morally obligate themselves to the task of seeking appropriate solutions to these needs; therefore we respectfully resolve:

1. That the delegates to the Annual Meeting of the Southern Conference convey to their churches the urgency of addressing themselves to the crisis problems in their local communities and seek solutions for resolving such problems;

2. That the Board of Directors will immediately appoint a committee to make a thorough study of all areas of operation within the Southern Conference to ascertain ways and means to implement a significant program at the Conference level to address the Conference to the Crisis in the Nation;

3. That all church-related institutions of the Southern Conference be informed through the Conference's Board of Directors of the Crisis in the Nation Programs of the United Church of Christ on the national level and that the Board solicit their cooperation and assistance in implementing viable programs wherever feasible;

4. That the delegates to the Southern Conference Annual Meeting convey to the churches who have declared themselves open to all ethnic groups that they create such opportunities within the scope of their churches to make open membership and equal opportunity a reality;

5. That the Southern Conference make a feasibility study of the Crisis as it relates to North Carolina and Virginia in the areas of leadership and programs, relative to black churches in the Southern Conference;

6. That the Southern Conference make special efforts to narrow the gap between black and white churches in terms of grassroots cooperative programming, particularly in those communities where geography and proximity are favorable;

7. That the Southern Conference send to all its member churches a letter containing information regarding the plans for the "City of Hope and Opportunity" in North Carolina and urge the churches and their members to study

carefully these plans and consider their individual and collective Christian responsibility in respect to this project; and finally,

8. That the Southern Conference send to all its member churches a copy of these resolutions as expeditiously as possible that we may realize the implementation of the spirit of these resolutions.

**HIGHER EDUCATION—HEALTH AND WELFARE COMMITTEE**

Your Coordinator along with Dr. and Mrs. W. W. Snyder, and Mr. and Mrs. Howard Regan, attended the annual meeting of the Council for Health and Welfare Services in New Orleans, La., January 13-16, 1969. The seminars and workshops are beneficial to the coordinator, and especially to the institutional administrators who attend. Nazareth Children's Home and Elon Home for Children are to be commended for sending their administrators each year.

Your elected committee met in regular session at Holiday Inn in Burlington, N. C., November 19, 1968 and organized itself into two sub-committees. Dr. Lonnie A. Carpenter was selected to chair the sub-committee on Higher Education, and Dr. Robert M. Kimball the sub-committee on Health and Welfare. Specific responsibilities were assigned to the two sub-committees.

The Sub-Committee on High Education met at First United Church of Christ, Salisbury, N. C. on January 24-25, 1969. The Sub-Committee, through the joint effort and support of the two college administrators, unanimously endorsed the observance of Higher Education Sunday to be observed in the churches of the Southern Conference on April 20, 1969.

The committee was informed that Campus Ministry is presently the responsibility of the Committee on Christian Education.

This committee is interested in the continued financial support of the two colleges in the Conference, especially in the light of the changing pattern of support from the denomination regarding institutions of Higher Education. At present Elon College receives \$35,000.00 from Southern Conference and nothing from General Synod. Catawba receives \$3,000.00 from Southern Conference and \$50,000.00 from General Synod. These reflect practices of the churches to which they were formerly related. We have discussed a central college fund with a formula for equitable distribution of funds to Elon and Catawba. Both colleges are presently in expansion programs.

Elon Home for Children is no longer included in the Southern Conference budget, but now appeals directly to the local churches for support. Nazareth Children's Home has had this approach for some time. Both now look directly to the churches for support. The Sub-Committee on Health and Welfare hopes in the future to bring together the Boards of Nazareth and Elon Home. Plans call for a consultant in Child Care in bringing us up to date on the latest methods and trends in residential care.

The Eastern Virginia Acting Association contributes leadership and financial support to "Half Way House" at Virginia Beach. The purpose of this project is to provide room and board and help find employment for persons who have just been released from penal institutions. The program at Franklinton Center, although not directly related to this committee, continues to fill a need for non residential services to the people who live near and who avail themselves of the services there offered.

The United Church Retirement Home, Inc. continues through this year to seek funds to match the \$500,000.00 challenge gift of Dr. J. W. Abernethy.

During the year your coordinator met with the directors of Nazareth and Elon homes for children, and the Sub-Committee on Higher Education. Mailings of materials of general interest were sent from the Conference Office to the Ministers. The institutions continue to keep you informed through literature and visits by administrators and executive secretaries.

The Committee on Higher Education—Health and Welfare recommends:

1. That each local church and related organization continue to give liberal support to our established Higher Education and Health and Welfare agencies.
2. That each local church and related organization continue to give liberal support toward the establishment of The United Church Retirement Home, Inc. soliciting pledges and funds to be reported during 1969.
3. That each local church establish a Committee on Higher Education—Health and Welfare Services and charge the Committee with the responsi-

bility of securing information on agencies and institutions and services available to the citizens of their community, through our Conference, The United Church of Christ, and public agencies, and to explore new avenues of service for persons in their communities.

4. That the Board of Directors of the Southern Conference overture the General Synod of the United Church of Christ at its meeting in Boston, Massachusetts, July 1969, that the future financial support of Elon College, Elon College, North Carolina, and Catawba College, Salisbury, North Carolina be no less than that which was received in 1968.

**REPORT OF UNITED CHURCH RETIREMENT HOME**

We are indeed grateful to each congregation and to each individual who has pledged and is giving to the United Church Retirement Home Fund. Although we have not been able to achieve total participation by the churches in the Southern Conference, we sincerely appreciate the help that we have received and hopefully will continue to receive from those congregations that have taken a devoted interest in the development of a plan and program for the care of the aged and aging in North Carolina. We have not reached our goal which was set when Mr. J. M. Abernethy challenged us to raise one-half of a million dollars and he would match our funds dollar for dollar and Mrs. Abernethy would donate a beautiful, rolling piece of property of about 85 acres east of the town of Newton, North Carolina on route 16 for the establishing of the home.

It is indeed a pleasure for me to report to you that the working drawings are now in progress. When these have been completed they will be presented to the United Church Retirement Home Board for final approval. The grading of the property is expected to begin in the near future. The Plans and Construction Committee through their chairman Mr. Jack Faw, will secure the services of a reputable firm to do this work.

We cannot, at this time, guarantee that the constructing of the building will begin in early spring or late summer, however, we are looking forward to beginning just as soon as possible.

We can successfully complete this project and establish a program of care for those who may desire residence in a comfortable home with your continued interest and support. Our program will be supervised by people who care and who approach their responsibilities in the Christian spirit.

May I challenge each congregation and each individual in our Conference to give to our United Church Retirement Home. We need your help. We have not in the past nor do we at present offer any type of Conference supported care for the aged in our Southern Conference. This type of care is greatly needed. We want to do our very best to render total service to all who need us and I am sure that you agree with me when I say that we need to serve and the aged need our service.

We would consider it a privilege to appear before any congregation or

group and present this cause. Please invite us if you need our assistance.

REPORT OF THE NAZARETH HOME

During the past year Nazareth Children's Home has cared for a total of 85 children. Thirty-three were received and 24 discharged, which accounts for an increase in population to our present 61 which is our capacity. We had none graduating from high school last year. Therefore all of our turnover except two were either returned to reestablished homes or were moved to other institutions; the two children became self supporting. The average per day population last year was 56.5. Age span is 6 years through 19 years. Applications continue to exceed available accommodation so that many children who need the type of services provided at Nazareth must remain in less desirable home situations.

Few applications have come from our own ministers and churches. I hope this is an indication of the stability of homes of United Church members. We do however give preference to referrals from our own people. On at least one occasion this year we had a referral from one of our ministers and did not have an available bed.

Nazareth Home continues to operate on what has been called a conservative budget and a conservative program. Granted the records will show that we operate at a cost per child well below the average and we do not have the professional staff recommended by Health and Welfare and other standard setting agencies. This should not be taken to mean that a valid program is not being realized. Our program is a working program and we are meeting the greater needs of the children who come to us. It is our intention to add to the staff in the near future a person qualified to assist in Social Service and education.

New facilities to replace the Payne building are nearing completion and may in fact be partially occupied by the date of the conference meeting. Four new buildings, 2 girls cottages, a central dining hall, and administration building will replace the 45 year old outmoded Payne building which has served as a combination dining hall, girls dorm and staff quarters.

The Board of Managers did not request permission to appeal directly to the Churches for funds to finance this nearly ½ million dollar project. Our efforts to raise these funds are directed toward individuals both within and out of our church, to Corporations and Foundations who are concerned for our work with homeless children. We are receiving pledges to be paid over a four year period and many are coming from United Church members. The Board of Managers has been assured that it will receive \$200,000.00 from the Carl H. Lyerly estate. We have already received \$100,000.00 of this amount.

Two boys, seniors at East Rowan High School, will leave our campus this summer, both hopefully will enter college. One has already been accepted at N. C. State University and the other has made application to Catawba College. We plan to have them both remain on campus through the summer while they work at public work. They are working part time at present and saving toward the cost of their college education.

Basis of support as suggested by the Board of Managers remains \$3.00 per member per year. I join the Board of Managers in expressing appreciation to the churches and church related organizations for your continued liberal support. Last year 38% of our budget came from these sources. Material contributions to Nazareth in the form of clothing, school supplies, food, medical supplies and others are a great help in keeping our cash budget so favorable.

**REPORT OF THE ELON HOME FOR CHILDREN**

There are two areas that are always of concern to an agency such as the Elon Home for Children. These two areas are those of programing and financing. It is about these two areas that we would like to speak to you in this report.

In the area of programming, last fall we had Mr. Milton Wilner, a Consultant from the Child Welfare League of America, to spend two days on our campus. He pointed out that the agency had excellent physical facilities in the cottages that it now has and with the completion of the two anticipated would meet the needs of the children in this respect. He also pointed out that the changes the Board had made in the child care program and is planning to make underlined the agency's commitment to care for children in need today. He pointed out that the past decisions to provide casework services to children and their families, to use psychiatric consultation and treatment, to employ a cottage-parent supervisor, and the agency's policy to serve all children in need regardless of race and faith are only a few of the examples that could be given.

A staff analysis of the types of children at the Elon Home for Children shows that approximately one half of the children can be classified as dependent and neglected and the remainder are emotionally disturbed. In contrast to the dependent and neglected child formerly referred, the agency is increasingly asked to serve the emotionally disturbed child. In effect, the agency is participating in a nation-wide child welfare trend. Increasingly, institutions such as ours are being forced to adapt their programs to provide care and treatment for emotionally disturbed children. Since this is the situation, there were a number of recommendations made to the Home for its consideration in its future operation.

The first recommendation was that the agency introduce an experimental basis male child care staff whose responsibility would include assisting the housemothers, participating in recreational activities with the children. The Home is at present undergoing such an experiment. We have on our staff this spring four young men from Elon College, who assist the housemother from 3:00 in the afternoon until 8:30 in the evening. This is, in reality, a pilot project which was begun the early part of February and will continue through May.

The second recommendation was that the agency should obtain two additional caseworkers. Our Home for Children at present has a Director of Casework and one full-time caseworker. It is hoped that the budget will allow a second caseworker to be added in September. As the number of disturbed children increases, and the number of dependent-neglected children decreases, the need for more casework will become greater. Experience in other such agencies indicates that at least 3 full-time caseworkers are necessary to meet the casework needs of 70 or more children and their parents.

The third recommendation made to our agency was that we could obtain a psychiatrist for at least 3 hours a week as a psychiatric consultant. The Home has recently secured the services of a psychiatrist from the School of Psychiatry at the University of North Carolina. At the present, he will give us two half-days per month, which is the equivalent of 2 hours per week. While the psychiatrist on this very limited basis may see some children, the emphasis will be on the use of the psychiatrist as a consultant to the staff. The fourth recommendation was that the administration establish a system of periodic review conferences in order to achieve greater coordination and integration of services. The Home, for over a year, has had a periodic staffing of various children; however, the administration is now working on plans to carry out this recommendation in a more effective way than it has in the past.

The fifth recommendation is that the agency should consider providing on-grounds educational service for children who are unable to benefit from attending public school. We would not in any case lose sight of the fact that the educational goal for each child in the institution would be for him to attend the public school. Our Home has found that many of the disturbed it has accepted experienced difficulty in public school either because of their behavior or because of academic deficiency or both. The local school system can hardly be expected to serve children who have, in many cases, been referred to the Elon Home for Children because of their poor adjustment in public schools. It is hoped that the agency can have such a program beginning this next school year.

Now let us turn our attention to the other area of concern and that is financing the total program. As far as the Southern Conference is concerned, we are concerned at this point with the support that we have received basically from the churches historically related to the Elon Home for Children. We are now endeavoring to get our churches to continue voluntarily directing to the Home what they have given heretofore through OCWM giving. This means that we should receive from these churches historically related to the Home, a total of \$25,000.00 per year over and above special giving. We recently sent out a form for our churches to fill out for us, giving us some indication as to what they would do along these lines. At the writing of this report, the reports that we have received were in some cases most disappointing. There were some churches that reported back to us that gave us much encouragement; however, those willing to do only special giving were far in excess of the number that would do over and above the special giving. Thus, we are concerned as to whether we will continue to receive the kind of support that we must receive from our churches if we are to do an adequate job in caring for those in our care.

We are more than pleased at this point with the increased interest and support that we are receiving from individuals, business, and industry beyond the church. However, we must say to you that at this point, the support that is coming through the churches historically related to the Elon Home for Children is very disappointing. More disappointing are the reports indicating the support that can be anticipated for the year. Perhaps the most disappointing fact is that over 2/3 of the churches historically related to the Home have not even returned the forms that were sent to them with a self-addressed, stamped envelope. We cannot help asking ourselves, what does church relatedness really mean? We certainly believe that it goes beyond finances; however, we believe that it includes financial support from each of the churches historically related to the Home.

#### REPORT OF ELON COLLEGE

Recently Dr. Nathan Pusey of Harvard University stated that this academic year "will surely prove to have been one of the most difficult in the history of higher education in America." Few of those who have been in

positions of responsibility on campuses would differ with his position. It has been an unusual, and extraordinary year in many respects.

## ENROLLMENT

Again this year we had an increase in the number of students in the day classes and a decrease in enrollment in the evening classes. Here is a summary of enrollment data for the fall terms of each of the last four years.

## PHYSICAL PLANT

In July we moved our library into the new building which provides space for 120,000 volumes and for 610 students to be seated for study in beautiful, well-equipped, air conditioned areas.

In September we moved into two new dormitories and in November we began to use the new cafeteria. These buildings have been named in honor of three of Elon's presidents: Dr. William Wesley Staley, Dr. Emmett Leonidas Moffitt, and Dr. William Allen Harper.

Construction is progressing on our classroom-office building and bids have been requested on an addition to the physical-education plant. These buildings will complete the necessary physical plant for an enrollment of 1800 students which was envisioned in the studies by the long-range planning committee.

## FACULTY

For sometime we have attempted to increase the number of faculty persons with the earned doctorate. For the term beginning in September we had a net increase of seven persons with the doctorate degree.

## CAMPAIGN

We are engaged in a major capital funds campaign, the E4 FUND. The first-phase goal is \$3 million of which more than one-half has now been secured in pledges and gifts. The overall goal for the total effort is \$7 million, the amount which will be needed to bring to full realization the long-range plans developed by the Board of Trustees.

## 4-1-4 CALENDAR

The College has been operating this academic year on the 4-1-4 Calendar. It has proven to be very popular with students and faculty and is making possible many interesting improvements in our instructional program. With the adoption of the 4-1-4 Calendar, we were able to complete our fall semester prior to the Christmas holidays. A one-month winter term was offered which provided many opportunities for experimentation in instructional methods and programs. We are quite pleased with the results of the winter term and feel that it has many possibilities that will help to improve our entire program and to seek new ways to stimulate learning.

## GUIDANCE PROGRAM

For the first time this year we have provided a guidance department with

three professionally trained guidance counselors working with our students in the area of academic problems. We are concerned about students who fail to do satisfactory academic work and feel that the work done by the guidance department is making an important difference in the level of achievement for many of our students.

**THE REPORT OF CATAWBA COLLEGE**

The 117th year of Catawba College, 1967-68, is characterized by the following events:

1. The tragic loss of a beloved member of the college community.
2. The successful completion of Phases I and II of the Catawba Challenge in response to Julius Abernethy's challenge gift of \$1,500,000 (these phases being respectively among the Board of Trustees and in the Salisbury-Rowan community).
3. The appointment of the 16th President of the College and his arrival in July.
4. The effective performance of the administration of the college.
5. Sound financial performance as indicated by a moderate surplus as of June 30, 1968.

Since July of 1968, significant events included:

1. Efforts of your new president to familiarize himself with the general nature and specific operations of the college.
2. Continuing concern for academic development and an expanded role of faculty participation.
3. Continuing financial strength and effective control over the budget.
4. Completion of new Development offices and a new building for the Department of Commerce and Economics.
5. Major personnel changes in the Dean of Student's office, as well as the establishment of closer rapport with students.
6. Intensive efforts by the Development office to complete Phase I and II of the Catawba Challenge and to organize for Phase III.
7. Satisfactory development and improvements in alumni relations.
8. A refinement in public relations and more extensive publicity.
9. A continued interest in the spiritual and intellectual development of the students.

Following is an attempt to review and evaluate in an overall way certain aspects of these seven months.

Dean Daniel E. Kirk reports faculty additions, curriculum revisions, and increased faculty participation in certain aspects of the college's decision-making process. In addition, there has been a moderate increase in the library budget this year as well as in hours the library is open for study. It is the President's judgment that the academic is the weakest aspect of the college.

The Business Office is smoothly run and well managed by Mr. Albert Carpenter. Financial resources, while not abundant, are both growing and under control. The college is developing additional resources all the while, and also operating within its \$2,236,000 budget. The greatest financial needs are:

1. For continued strengthening of endowment, particularly in the form of estate planning, bequests and wills; and
2. To generate larger current support through an Annual Fund, to involve more fully all of the college's constituencies.

The most notable aspects about the physical facilities of the college are:

1. Letting of contracts and beginning construction of the Physical Education Center.
2. Completion of the new office facilities for the Development, Public Relations, and Alumni staffs.
3. Construction of the new Commerce and Economics Building.

Efforts are now in process to prepare for rapid construction of the Student Center, with the possible addition of much needed classroom space. Sound planning for this building may save the college much in dollar resources in the future.

The gift of the Hedrick Home by the Johnson Foundation is another notable addition to physical assets of the college. It is valued at approximately \$100,000, and thought is being given to its full utilization.

There is no need to recount in detail the success to date of the Development office. The three directors have joined together to comprise a professional team. They have performed well. Successful completion of Phases I and II and indications of success in Phase III augur well for increased endowment to add fundamental and continuous financial strength; new physical facilities which, when joined with a new dormitory, will offer nearly ideal facilities for 1,000 students; debt retirement which will release scarce resources for better use; and academic development, which will permit additional faculty, more attractive salaries, a more vibrant program, and a much enhanced library. These things, when accomplished, will mean a stronger and enriched Catawba College.

In public relations, Mr. David Setzer has performed masterfully. Mr. Foster Owen, Director of Alumni Relations, has worked diligently.

Dean of Students Robert Boyd reports personnel changes in his office, as well as steps taken to reduce the bureaucratic nature of student life. The basic result of these changes has been an improvement, in general, in the mature behavior of the students. This is particularly true in regard to the new attendance system.

Student participation in campus activities has been both high and significant. Because of this and the able leadership of the Student Government Association, a closer rapport has been established between the students and the administration. It is hoped that dialogue and issue confrontation at the verbal level will remain the tools of Catawba students.

Morale, then, of the students is generally good. This, even though approximately 80 men are residing in substandard facilities. It is the hope of the Dean's office that a men's dormitory may soon be constructed. Need for such a facility is pressing.

One may accurately conclude that Catawba College is a strong institution, with its various functions being generally well performed. Detailed analysis, however, leads to the conclusion that certain improvements are in order. The establishment of the Catawba Challenge by the Board of Trustees indicates that there is an awareness of needs of the college.

Substantial improvement is necessary in the academic aspect of the college. More terminally qualified (Ph.D.) faculty must be employed. A policy for continued faculty development is essential. There is also need to increase substantially faculty salaries and benefits. Moreover, an evaluation of the academic program is required.

In terms of student life, additional scholarship aid is needed. Efforts should be intensified to complete the badly needed Student Center. A center for student counselling will be established soon. Head residents in the men's dormitories are much needed.

Beyond these needs, it is essential that provision be made to complete the \$5,000,000 Catawba Challenge and that a process of long-range planning be conceived and implemented.

The Board of Trustees took favorable action in regard to these items during the February 18, 1969 meeting.

The entire college community is proud of its 118-year history and relationship with the church. It moreover is grateful for the support you have rendered over the years, but as my predecessors have indicated in the past, additional support, particularly current financial assistance, is a genuine necessity.

This, then, is Catawba College: a college with strengths in which we have justifiable pride, a college with needs of which we are fully aware. It is a college with immense potential for qualitative development—it has a base for further greatness. This potential and this base may, and can, well serve to stir us all to bring our physical energies, our economic resources, our intellectual capacities, and our spiritual strengths to Catawba College in greater service to God and man.

the three administrative Areas has not materialized as yet. This is a matter of concern for the committee. We hope it is also a matter of concern for you. Steps are now being taken looking to such a conference or series of conferences either in the fall of 1969 or the spring of 1970.

Your committee through its chairman did help support the Workshop on Evangelism sponsored by the North Carolina Council of Churches last spring.

In the area of worship, Church Music Workshops are being held each year at the Blowing Rock Assembly Grounds. The Southern Conference is grateful to the leadership Mrs. A. R. Keppel has given to the workshop over the past two years. The workshop this year will be held July 17-19 at the Blowing Rock Assembly grounds under the leadership of Professor Fletcher C. Moore, Dean of Elon College.

"The Local Church in God's Mission" is the 1968-69 Emphasis of the United Church of Christ. Special committees in the Southern Conference and the three Administrative Areas introduced the emphasis and the materials available for use by local churches to the pastors and key lay people. The experience of the congregations that have engaged in the program of self-study and development testifies to the fact that every congregation has much to gain from participation in the emphasis.

Recommendations:

1. That every local congregation become concerned not only to grow in membership but to win new converts to Christ. Evangelism is a major challenge to the church in the world today.
2. That local churches make use of the materials and processes available through the 1968-69 Emphasis on "The Local Church in God's Mission" in order that they may become more effective units in God's Kingdom.
3. That churches encourage their choir directors, organists and other interested persons to attend the Church Music Workshop July 17-19 at the Blowing Rock Assembly Grounds and, where possible, to give financial assistance in order to make attendance possible.

**THE HISTORICAL COMMITTEE**

The most important single historical event among our churches during the year has been the appearance of "A STORY OF THE SOUTHERN SYNOD OF THE EVANGELICAL AND REFORMED CHURCH," by Rev. Banks J. Peeler, D.D. This ably written clothbound book of 505 pages is a storehouse of inspiration and knowledge of personalities, churches, institutions and agencies of "Reformed" tradition of our Evangelical and Reformed Church of the United Church of Christ in the South. This work was authorized by the Southern Synod four years ago and was published under the supervision of the Board of Editors consisting of Rev. Frank W. Snider, Chairman, Rev. Lonnie Carpenter, D.D., Mr. Frank Clapp, Rev. Aubrey W. Hedrick, Mr. Howard White. Its story of witness from 1740 to 1968 not only contains valuable information concerning the past but gives a story of the deep faith and solid strength of our Evangelical and Reformed colleagues.

A "Church History Autograph Reception" was held at the Library of Catawba College, Salisbury, North Carolina, on Sunday, March 23, 1969, attended by a large number of church representatives and friends. Our congratulations to Dr. Peeler and his associates of the Board of Editors for this excellent historical work. It will be a part of the history of our constituencies of the Southern Conference. The second and third parts will be the history of the churches of the Convention of the South of Congregational Christian Churches being written by Rev. J. Taylor Stanley; and the "History of the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches" now in the process of being collected and written by Rev. William T. Scott, D.D. This latter history was authorized by the Historical Society of the Southern Convention, and is being implemented by its History Committee composed of Dr. Clyde L. Fields, Chairman; Dr. J. Earl Daineley, Mrs. Oma U. Johnson, Mrs. Mark W. Andes, Dr. J. H. Overton, and Dr. Scott.

Rev. J. P. Mangrum, veteran minister of the Southern Conference and distinguished retired educator, is the author of "A Brief History of the N. C. Christian Conference 1866-1968." This valuable work appeared in connection with the observance in 1968 of the organization of conferences and churches of our Negro brethren more than 100 years ago.

From the Southern Conference Yearbook, we have made a hurried study of the organization dates of our 413 member-churches. We found that 23 churches indicate no organization date, and from personal knowledge we know that other dates are inaccurate. We urge our churches to establish the accurate date of organization, prepare a historical sketch and deposit it with the Church History Room, Elon College, N. C., the temporary depository for historical documents and materials of the Southern Conference.

In our study we found that we have churches over or nearing 200 years of age. We list these with year of organization as given in the 1968 Yearbook.

**COMMITTEE ON LAY LIFE AND WORK**

The Committee for Lay Life and Work is the conference-wide planning committee for coordinating the work of lay people as they seek to witness effectively for Jesus Christ in all areas of their lives. In our conference much of this activity centers around the Churchmen's Fellowship and the Church Women's Fellowship. Under our conference structure, the Lay Life and Work Committee is the coordinating committee for planning leadership opportunities for lay men and lay women. In addition, we have the responsibility to provide encouragement and resources to other groups who have not been involved in existing groups to try new ventures in lay life and work. During the past two years, a real effort has been made on both the national and conference levels to help us to see the mission of the church as a whole and for instrumentalities and committees to work together on problems of common concern. Some progress has been made and we feel that the opportunity is present to do much more. We are fortunate to have the assistance of a National staff member who lives in our area—Mrs. Emily Lester. Our conference minister has been most helpful in working closely with this committee. We look forward to the time when our conference budget will be adequate to provide a staff person to work with laity groups on a full-time basis.

The Committee for Lay Life and Work had its first meeting of this fiscal year in the form of an overnight retreat at Moonelon Center August 6 and 7. The Reverend Richard Rinker, Dr. James H. Lightbourne, Jr., and Mrs. F. C. Lester helped to plan and carry out a program to provide committee members with some orientation, sensitivity training and an opportunity to get acquainted before evaluating the activities of the past year and making program plans for the current year. A second meeting was held on February 15, 1969, to hear progress reports from members with responsibility for certain plans of the committee and to plan further for the needs in our area of responsibility.

This year's activities have included sponsoring the Women's Summer Conference held June 25-27, 1968 in Elon College. The Church Women of the

Southern Conference were asked to continue providing leadership for this project. Mrs. W. H. Duncan of Greensboro was the chairman. Reverend Myles Walborn, Reverend Barbara McCall and Miss Madeliene McCain provided the outside leadership. 163 people participated (3 leaders and 78 women stayed in the dormitories and participated fulltime. Another 82 people registered as day participants and did not live in the dormitory. Some of them attended full time while others may have attended only one day's sessions.) This year's conference will be held at Catawba College June 17-19, 1969. Mrs. John Fox and Mrs. Leo Luther, both of Asheboro, are co-chairmen.

This Committee sponsored "A Christian Happening" at Blowing Rock Assembly Grounds July 12-14, 1968. Mrs. Van Grimes and Mr. Dale Bennett were co-chairmen. Dr. John Casteel of the national Council for Lay Life and Work staff provided the leadership in both planning and during the retreat. 32 people participated.

Fall Enrichment Programs were sponsored in each of the three associations by the Church women in November. Over three hundred people attended with offerings totalling \$279.30 being sent to help support the music ministry of Mr. Howard Anderson in Mexico.

The Committee felt that its new assignment of Mission Education was given adequate special emphasis this year due to the fact that the Board of World Ministries met in this conference area in November with the conference staff arranging for missionaries attending the meetings as well as other people to be guest speakers in many local churches in the conference. Many churches also have been studying Southeast Asia as their mission theme for the year. Special emphasis was placed on this at the Summer Conference and Spring Laity Workshops of 1968.

The Committee sponsored a Family Camping Weekend at Johns River Camp similar to the ones held in the past. Mr. Bill Starr was chairman. We are aware of at least one church that has sponsored similar events for their own congregations.

The Family Thank Offering and Laity Sunday were both sponsored by this committee with the conference office staff taking the responsibility for the publicity and promotion.

A Laity Retreat was held March 7-9 at Franklinton Center. Mr. Charles Patterson, Norfolk, Virginia, was chairman of this event. This was a very meaningful experience for the 26 people attending. It is hoped that the future retreats can be equally successful in content and more successful in attracting a broader representation from the churches throughout the Southern Conference.

Rev. Dwight Moore, Rev. Larry Fisher and Rev. Tracy Floyd each assumed the responsibility for convening the planning committees of the three associations to plan for the Spring Laity Workshops to be held April 13, 1969. These meetings are for the purpose of introducing new program resources for all adult laity groups in our churches. This year, three smaller packets will be sent at intervals throughout the year reducing the overwhelming effect of one big packet plus allowing for more opportunity to add new and timely materials on current problems.

Your Committee Coordinator and Mr. Dale Bennett attended the meeting of the national council for Lay Life and Work in Milwaukee, Wisconsin in late January. The theme of the meeting was "Lay-Clergy Colaboration." Also attending from our conference were Rev. Larry Fisher, Mrs. W. B. Williams and John R. Kernodle, Jr., who are members of the National Council and Mrs. F. C. Lester and Dr. Lightbourne were the staff members attending from our area.

Much summer planning of the Stewardship and OCWM Area Association Committees resulted in Stewardship Workshops for laity and ministers in September 1968. An evaluation of this effort was made by the Stewardship and OCWM Area Chairmen, OCWM Co-ordinator, Conference Staff, and the Regional Secretary of Stewardship Council, Rev. Karlton Johnson, meeting in Henderson, N. C. November 14, 1968. The workshops were not as effective as anticipated since many of the churches attending already had active and effective OCWM programs, while the churches that might have received the most benefit were not there. One of the more constructive elements was the positive atmosphere or spirit that existed as black and white Christians met and worked together for our Creator.

Also at the November meeting was discussed the real need for a personal element to provide mission and stewardship information to our people, such as the use of bulletin boards monthly, posters, every family mailbox, monthly newsletter, use of outside help, audio-visuals, etc.

The Virginia Associations were trying to provide this personal element of support and information to its ministers March 1, 1969 at a Stewardship Retreat.

Providing support and recognition to the pastor who is often caught in the middle between Conference leaders and the UCC at large and the local church people he serves, was a major problem considered at the meeting of Regional leaders and Stewardship Council Staff of the UCC held in Atlanta, Ga. January 15-16, 1969. The pastor needs to be appreciated more for the difficult task he has in promoting responsible stewardship through the UCC OCWM Programs. The local church people can be especially helpful if they support their minister better financially and work with him on Christian stewardship education. A minister feels insecure and cannot work effectively when his income is less than most of his parishioners and when his tenure is threatened when he uses OCWM programs or presents the real needs of the Christian community even though it may differ from what we want to hear.

The second major discussion at the Regional Stewardship Meeting was whether to engage upon an Every Church Visitation thrust with guidance our Conferences and UCC instrumentalities have available. This would be especially to help implement the organization of active Stewardship and OCWM and Christian Enlistment Committees in each local church as recommended last

year. The "trust relationship" between all levels of the UCC leaders and the local church people again loomed large in the discussions. Perhaps the distrust of Conference and UCC leaders is due partly because we fail to accept or to seek help offered until a local church is in dire need. Some Conferences in the Southern Region of the UCC agreed to focus on an Every Church Visitation program in 1969-70.

The Stewardship and OCWM Committee and Conference leaders of the Southern Conference, meeting February 13th at Burlington, N. C. decided thus:

1. Since our Southern Conference OCWM record was about the same as 1967, the real need for an increase in OCWM Goals and giving for 1970 is clearly seen.

2. Much needs to be done in stewardship education, so we will make Selected Church Visits rather than an Every Church Visitation.

3. The formula for assigning Goals for 1970 will be: No Goal less than 1969. Minimum Goal will show a 2% increase over Stairway of Progress percentage for 1969. Challenge Goal will be 5% Percentage Increase.

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**MINUTES**  
**EASTERN NORTH CAROLINA ASSOCIATION**  
of the  
**UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST**

October 23, 1968

The second annual meeting of the Eastern North Carolina Association of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, was called to order by the President, The Rev. Lowell A. Smoot, at 10:00 a.m. at the Southern Pines United Church of Christ, Southern Pines, North Carolina. Hymn and prayer was led by the Rev. J. H. Little. The Rev. John E. Harrison, Host Minister, welcomed the group to the Church.

A Summary Report of Executive Committee Meetings was read by the Secretary. (Exhibit A) Report approved as read.

The Treasurer's Report was made by Mr. W. B. Cope, which included per capita dues received during 1968. Additional remittances had been received since the report was compiled and the Treasurer announced that he would be happy to accept dues should any churches desire to pay them today. (Exhibit B) Report approved as read.

Dr. Fields indicated that all committee reports were stapled together except the Budget and Finance Committee, for the convenience of the delegates.

**SPECIAL ITEM OF BUSINESS**

When the Eastern North Carolina Association was organized in 1967, not all of the Acting Associations were ready to come into the Association. On October 10, the Eastern Atlantic Acting Association voted to petition to become a part of the Eastern North Carolina Association and on October 18, the North North Carolina Christian Acting Association.

Dr. J. H. Lightbourne, Conference Minister, suggested that we accept the petitions, that delegates be seated, to become effective January 1, 1969, in order to give the Executive bodies time to complete all the necessary business. There were brief remarks from officers of the Acting Associations.

**Voted 1: ENCA '68**

That Churches of the petitioning Associations be admitted, the delegates and members be seated and that the legal consummation of this action become effective January 1, 1969.

The Rev. L. A. Leonard gave a brief progress report on the United Church Retirement Home.

Mrs. Eugene Amick made a very inspiring appeal on behalf of Our Christian World Mission. Mrs. Amick made two practical suggestions: (1) that each Church have a Stewardship and OCWM Committee, and (2) that each Church have a Christian Enlistment Committee.

## COMMITTEE REPORTS

### Voted 2: ENCA '68

That the Evangelism Committee Report be received and adopted. (Exhibit C)

### Voted 3: ENCA '68

That the Christian Social Action Committee Report be received and adopted. (Exhibit D)

### Voted 4: ENCA '68

That the Stewardship and OCWM Committee Report be received. (Exhibit E) There was some discussion about churches that may not be able to meet their goals. This would be worked out within the local Church.

### Voted 5: ENCA '68

That the Church and Ministry Report be received and adopted. (Exhibit F) There was some discussion in light of the admission of the two Acting Associations.

The Rev. Robert M. Kimball gave the Report for the Budget and Finance Committee. Mr. Kimball indicated that only 75 percent of the churches had paid per capita dues in 1968.

### Voted 6: ENCA '68

That the proposed budget be accepted and approved and that we continue asking our churches to continue paying dues of 25c per member. (Exhibit G)

### Voted 7: ENCA '68

That the Emphasis Committee Report be received and adopted. (Exhibit H) There was some question regarding ministers in the North Carolina Acting Association who were not listed as licentiates in the Church and Ministry Report at this point.

### Voted 8: ENCA '68

That names of persons omitted because of the decision of the Acting Associations be placed in the Committee's Report.

After a Hymn, Dr. James H. Lightbourne, Jr., was introduced to deliver the sermon. The message was very timely.

The Association recessed for lunch in the Church dining hall, after a Service of Licensure and Recognition by the Rev. Richard Jackson.

## AFTERNOON SESSION

Meeting was called to order by President Lowell A. Smoot at 1:30 p.m. Hymn and prayer led by the Rev. M. C. Steed.

Mrs. Tracy Floyd gave a beautiful presentation on "With Love to The Church."

Mrs. Earl Parker spoke briefly regarding the Eastern North Carolina Church Women, in the absence of Mrs. Grant Burns, and Mr. Robert Baxter

made brief remarks about the Eastern North Carolina Churchmen's Fellowship.

Dr. Clyde Fields, Area Minister, reported on the work of the Eastern North Carolina Churchmen's Fellowship and called attention to the organizational meeting to be held at Elon College on November 10, 1968.

Report on our Southern Conference Concerns was made by Dr. James H. Lightbourne as follows:

1. OCWM report included in the **Southern Conference News**.
2. Please distribute the **Southern Conference News**.
3. Policy Statement on offerings. (Exhibit I)
4. The Elon Home for Children is not in the 1969 budget of the Southern Conference. It is imperative that Churches continue to support this Home. This money will not be credited to our OCWM goals. All Churches were asked to include the Nazareth Home and Elon Home for Children in their budgets.
5. The Crisis in the nation. We would hope that our Churches would participate.
6. OCWM giving this year is running approximately the same as a year ago.

**Voted 9: ENCA '68**

That the Amendments to the By-Laws of the Eastern North Carolina Association be adopted. (Exhibit J)

**Voted 10: ENCA '68**

That the Nominating Committee Report be adopted. (Exhibit K)

Dr. Fields expressed appreciation for the work of so many people in the forming of the Eastern North Carolina Association. The Executive Committee has fulfilled requirements for the year by meeting two times. The Executive Committee would like to meet with Churches in various sections of the Eastern North Carolina Association. We would also like for the annual meeting to be in various parts of the Association. It would require seating space for about 300 persons. Dr. Fields also expressed appreciation to members of the Executive Committee, and especially the President, who had given considerable time to the Association this year. Dr. King has resigned, but the Rev. Mr. Howard Cunningham will take his place; Mr. W. B. Cope, Treasurer, and the Secretary.

Dr. Fields indicated that it would be good if committees would get together and elect chairmen before leaving the meeting so that the committees could proceed with their work. If there was a committee where there are too few for a committee to meet, he would suggest the chairman for last year would serve until a formal meeting of the committee.

1968 STEWARDSHIP AND OCWM COMMITTEE REPORT**

Your committee has met several times during the year seeking to promote Christian Stewardship and Our Christian World Mission Goals.

The Rev. Karlton Johnson, of the Stewardship Council, met with the committee on May 27, 1968, as our resource leader. Mr. Johnson suggested, among other things, the use of special days for Stewardship Education and a more effective use of Stewardship Council materials. Many of these materials can be ordered free of charge from the Council.

Other meetings were held at the Trinity UCC Garner, N. C. for the purpose of working out OCWM Goals for 1969 and planning for the Christian Enlistment Workshops.

Four workshops were held in our Association during the month of September. Host churches were Durham UCC, Haw River, Southern Pines and Myrtle Grove UCC. There was a total of 178 people representing 62 churches in attendance. Three areas of OCWM concerns were presented and discussed. 1. Stewardship and Missionary Education, 2. Christian Enlistment in a local church, 3. OCWM Goals—Explanation and Discussion.

We express our thanks and appreciation to Rev. Clyde L. Fields, Mrs. Eugene Amick, and Rev. Lowell A. Smoot for their help and guidance in our work.

Because of the importance of Christian Stewardship in our local churches and the great need for the Support of Our Christian World Mission (OCWM) — we make the following recommendations:

1. That each local church consider the appointment of a committee for Christian Stewardship and Our Christian World Mission.
2. That each church accept at least the Minimum Goal for OCWM as an expression of their faith in God's great mission.
3. That all of our churches send remittance to the Southern Conference Office monthly, or at least quarterly. This will enable us to meet our OCWM obligations on a regular basis.
4. That our local churches use the Stairway of Progress Plan involuntarily in increasing their goals.

Report of Remittances on OCWM Goals for Local Churches of our Association through October 7, 1968, are being mailed to Treasurers of Local Churches and printed in the Issue of the current Southern Conference News. We urge each church to meet the OCWM Goal in full.

1968 EMPHASIS COMMITTEE REPORT**

The "Local Church in God's Mission" is the theme of the emphasis suggested by the General Synod of the United Church of Christ. This is not a program handed down by the national body of our church, but a suggested way to help the local church plan its action as servant of the mission of God. Contrary to some who feel that the local church is about to pass into oblivion, this process is based on the conviction that the local church is the chief carrier of the story of God's loving concern for all mankind and that the local church has great potential.

The method basic to this process is planning, planning by the local church for the local church's goals and actions. The planning is based on a fresh grasp of the mission of the church, in the light of the changing world about us, with a critical eye at what the church is now doing.

The following helps are, or will be, available to assist the local church experience a renewal through this planning process: (1) The Local Church Emphasis Packet, available from Central Distribution Service, 1505 Race St., Philadelphia, Pa. 19102. This packet includes the exploration guide, "The Local Church in God's Mission," which is commonly called the blue book. (2) The Association Committee, constituted by two people from each program district in the Association. (3) Workshops to be scheduled in early 1969.

POLICY STATEMENT ON OFFERINGS**

A Policy Statement adopted by the Board of Directors of the Southern Conference, October 8, 1968 and addressed to the churches and ministers of the Southern Conference in an effort to clarify the kinds of offerings the churches are requested to receive in support of our total mission enterprise. Obviously there is the additional hope that clarification will result in generous support of these offerings.

## A. All-Church Offerings of the United Church of Christ

The **One Great Hour of Sharing—Share Our Substance (OGHS-SOS)** offering is for the support of the work of the Division of World Service of the Board for World Ministries. It meets the emergency needs of people in time of famine, fire, earthquake, war and revolution both at home and abroad. It also meets the needs of people, especially those overseas, who are in a chronic state of deprivation—for example, displaced persons.

The offering is usually held on the fourth Sunday in Lent.

The offering does not count toward the church's Basic Support Goal for Our Christian World Mission, but does receive Year Book Credit under "Other Support" for OCWM.

The **Neighbors in Need** offering is for the support of special projects in one or several areas of the mission administered by homeland ministries and commissions.

The homeland instrumentalities whose work in any one year may be furthered by this offering are: Board for Homeland Ministries, Council for Christian Social Action, Office of Communications, and Council for Church and Ministry.

The offering is received in the fall. The first Sunday in October, World-Wide Communion Sunday, is the recommended date.

The offering does not count toward the church's Basic Support Goal for Our Christian World Mission, but does receive Year Book Credit for "Other Support" for OCWM.

## B. Regular Special Offerings of the United Church of Christ

The **Christmas Fund** is the annual special offering of churches and contributions from individuals in response to a mail appeal for the relief of ministers, their wives, and widows.

This fund makes it possible for the Pension Boards to help ministers and their families who are in special financial crises, or to help retired ministers, their wives or widows whose minimum retirement income needs occasional supplementation.

The appeal is made in the period immediately before Christmas. Gifts from churches are reported in the "Other Support" for OCWM column in the Year Book.

The **Family Thank Offering** is a gift given especially by the members of the lay groups within the churches to further strengthen Our Christian World Mission. This offering is initiated and publicized by the Council for Lay Life and Work. It is used to support projects recommended by the national instrumentalities in their areas of responsibility.

Accumulated during the year in gift boxes in the homes or in other ways a local church may decide, the offering is received annually, and in some cases more often. Perhaps the most frequent time for its gathering is in the spring or near Thanksgiving Day.

Unlike the other offerings, the Family Thank Offering is not reported in the figures of each church in the columns of the Year Book, by request of the Council for Lay Life and Work.

### **C. Emergency Offerings of the United Church of Christ**

A special **Emergency Offering** is an all-church collection for direct human aid, occasioned by a crisis caused by natural disaster or social disarrangement. Inasmuch as an offering of this kind meets needs which are unpredictable in both kind and amount, the offering may occur at any time. In any given year there may be several such offerings or none.

A national emergency offering takes place only when authorized by the General Synod or its Executive Council. Year Book credit is given in the column for "Other Support" for OCWM.

### **D. Southern Conference Offerings**

1. The Southern Conference urges support of the Spring and Fall All-Church Offering, the Christmas Fund, the Family Thank Offering and the Emergency Offerings of the United Church of Christ.

2. All-Church special offerings within the Southern Conference are authorized by the Annual Meeting of the Conference or by the Board of Directors. Such offerings would be for the support of some phase of the conference program or one of its institutions or centers.

An example would be the annual special offerings encouraged in support of the two Homes for Children (Elon and Nazareth) of the Conference.

3. Individual churches customarily receive offerings for different institutions and enterprises of the Conference in which they have special interest. At times these offerings are in support of sums placed in their budgets. This manner of raising funds is by decision of the local congregation.

The institutions related to the Southern Conference desiring to solicit regular support on an annual basis from the churches of the Conference are requested to submit their proposals to the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors will study the request and will authorize special offerings in light of the total financial program of the Conference. This policy will be initiated in preparation for the year of 1970.

4. It is the policy of the Southern Conference to authorize only those offerings it believes worthy and consistent with its total mission enterprise. It seeks to hold in check the number of official special requests that go to local churches in order that churches may not be burdened by a multiplicity of requests but may be given the opportunity to exercise Christian generosity in response to clearly designated needs and opportunities for witness to the Christian Gospel.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE BY-LAWS OF THE  
EASTERN NORTH CAROLINA ASSOCIATION

1968 ANNUAL MEETING FOR ACTION

**Page 5, Paragraph 4, Section 3:** Amend by substitution of 100 for 200 in lines 4 and 5 and eliminate the words "or major fraction thereof."

**Page 10, Article VI—Executive Committee, Paragraph 29, Section 1:** Amend by adding the following paragraph:

"The Administrative Committee, elected by the Executive Committee, shall be made up of: The President, the Vice-President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, and Area Minister, Ex-Officio with voice but without vote, and 2 other persons from the Executive Committee (1 lay person and 1 minister). Said Administrative Committee shall possess and exercise such powers and functions of the Executive Committee as the Executive Committee may, from time to time, delegate to it."

**Page 12 ff., Article VIII — Committees:** Amend by substituting the following:  
**37. Section 1**

There shall be 5 Association Committees, namely: Evangelism and Worship, Christian Education, Stewardship and OCWM, Church and Ministry, Budget and Finance, and such other committees as the Association may from time to time determine.

These Committees are to be composed of lay members and ministers.  
There shall be a Chairman of each of the 5 Association Committees.

**38. Section 2. Duties of Committees**

**a. Evangelism and Worship**

The Committee on Evangelism and Worship shall work closely with the Coordinator for Evangelism and Worship of the Southern Conference and shall concern itself with the spiritual life of the Churches in terms of strengthening the Christian commitment of the membership of the local churches through conferences, devotional literature, worship, and stewardship.

It shall feel a responsibility for the recruitment of the unchurched, and it shall assist in making every congregation a more effective evangelistic force. It shall assist the local churches in developing programs for effective training in church membership. It shall assist the churches of the Association in suggesting and advising them concerning procedures and practices of meaningful Christian Worship.

**b. Christian Education**

The Committee on Christian Education shall work closely with the Coordinator for Christian Education of the Southern Conference. The members of the Southern Conference Committee on Christian Education from this

Association shall also be members of the Association Committee. Additional members shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee.

The Committee shall consider areas of its work in relation to Children's Ministries, Youth Ministries, Adult Ministries, Specialized Ministries, and Leadership Ministries, and such other areas of concern as may be approved or directed by the Association or the Executive Committee.

**c. Stewardship and OCWM**

The Committee on Stewardship and OCWM shall work closely with the Coordinator for Stewardship and OCWM of the Southern Conference and with the Stewardship Council of the United Church of Christ, to foster within the Association the principle and practice of Christian stewardship.

The Committee shall work to secure support for the Conference Budget, the Association needs, and the United Church of Christ budget for Our Christian World Mission.

The Committee shall recommend specific OCWM Goals for each local church to help meet these budgets.

The Committee shall assess the value and need of all special fund raising drives of the Association, correlating time schedules and seeking participation by the local churches.

**d. Church and Ministry**

The Committee for Church and Ministry shall work closely with the Coordinator for Church and Ministry of the Southern Conference as it seeks to study and oversee the program for the Association in such areas of concern as pastoral relations, professional standards, education for church related vocations, life enlistment, aid for students In Care of Association, in service training, social and parish workers, and chaplaincies.

It shall be responsible for all duties described in Article 1, The Ministry, of the By-Laws of the United Church of Christ, and shall carry on its work within the general framework provided therein.

**e. Budget and Finance**

The Committee on Budget and Finance shall work closely with the Stewardship and OCWM Committee to the end that the local churches and the Association may be made aware of the importance of careful and sound practices concerning finances.

The Committee shall present at each Annual Meeting of the Association a suggested Association Budget for the coming fiscal year. Financial support for the work and budget of the Association shall come from the member churches on a Per Capita Basis.

**Section 3.**

All of the above Committees shall meet one or more times each year as necessary.

Each Committee shall be composed of at not less than four members provided each Program District is represented so far as practical and possible.

There shall be other committees or changes in the above named committees as the Association may from time to time determine.

**ARTICLE IX—DISTRICTS, Section 2, page 15.** Amend by eliminating numerals from churches in each of the Districts; eliminating Caswell, N. C., from South Boston District, adding Caswell to Burlington District; and adding New Hanover to New Bern District.

**Tuesday, October 22, 1968**

The first Annual Meeting of the Western North Carolina Association met Tuesday, October 22, 1968 at Catawba College, Salisbury, N. C. The meeting opened at 10:10 a.m. A period of devotion was conducted by the Rev. James Cress.

President Marlin Schaeffer then introduced Dr. M. L. Sholtzberger, President of Catawba College, who gave the welcoming remarks.

Special guests were then recognized by President Schaeffer.

The Rev. Edwin Alcorn, Area Minister, then introduced new ministers that had come into our Association during the last year.

The Secretary read the minutes of the organizational meeting including pertinent matters that had been discussed in the two executive sessions held during the year. No changes were noted and the minutes were approved.

The Conference Minister, the Rev. James H. Lightbourne, Jr. gave his report next. He stated that Eastern Virginia, an acting association of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, now has a target date of January 1, 1970 by which time it hopes to become an Association thereby changing its status from an acting association to the full membership and participation of an Association. Dr. Lightbourne further pointed out that our conference is unique in that it has significant numbers of people from both E and R and CC backgrounds and also significant numbers of differing racial backgrounds. He pointed out how fortunate we are to have two colleges and two children's homes in our conference. He reminded us that we have a solemn responsibility in this high privilege.

Dr. Lightbourne continued his report by challenging the Association to urge young people to seriously consider the ministry and other church related tasks. He asked that our attitudes in our homes be conducive to this and urged that we speak well of our churches and ministers and honestly recognize the greatness of the church and the solemn task she faces.

Rev. Edwin M. Alcorn then gave his report. As it was printed he did not read it. (A copy of the report is attached).

There were 70 Ministers, 100 Lay Delegates, and 30 visitors for a total of 200 persons attending this meeting. A quorum was declared to be present. Proposed changes in the By-Laws were read, approved and adopted (see attached).

Mr. Willie Everhart suggested that the names and addresses of the nominating committee be published in the Southern Conference News. This was agreed upon by common consent.

Dr. George Dillinger reported for the Church and Ministry Committee. It was recommended that Shiloh Christian at Ramseur, N. C. and Ramseur Christian be removed from our roll of churches at their request.

VOTED: To remove these churches with our regrets.

Dr. Dillinger then read a petition for membership in our association by Pilgrim Church, Charlotte, N. C.

VOTED: To receive this church into membership.

It was recommended that the Rev. Jack L. Crater be granted "Privilege of Call" for one year retroactive to August 11, 1968.

VOTED: That the Rev. Jack L. Crater be granted "Privilege of Call."

Mr. James L. Clark was recommended for Licensure.

VOTED: To grant Licensure to Mr. James L. Clark.

The Rev. E. N. Young asked for ministerial standing. The committee recommended that this request be granted pending a meeting with Mr. Young at the noon hour.

VOTED: To grant this if the committee approves it.

Tellers for the Election Committee were read out by President Schaeffer.

The Nominating Committee's report was given by Dr. Lonnie Carpenter in the absence of the chairman Thomas Madren who was unable to attend because of a funeral.

Ballots were distributed. It was stated that all nominees had been contacted to determine if they would serve. All nominated had agreed to this.

A motion was made that all nominees as listed be elected unanimously, and that the secretary be instructed to cast a ballot as such.

VOTED: That this be done. (List of new officers attached).

The Rev. Roy E. Leinbach, Jr. reported for the Conference Board of Directors. (Two reports are attached dealing with emphasis in stewardship).

Dr. Lonnie Carpenter then spoke about a new publication concerning the Evangelical and Reformed History of The Southern Synod. Dr. Banks J. Peeler is the author of this book. Dr. Carpenter urged all members to secure a copy for themselves and their churches. Mr. Henry Kennedy also spoke to this matter and urged immediate participation. Mrs. Lonnie Carpenter and Mr. William Greenland were designated as those from whom books might be ordered.

Recess for lunch came at 12:15.

The meeting reconvened at 1:45 P.M.

The Rev. Emmett O. Floyd led in a hymn and prayer.

Rev. Wayne Fouts, chairman of the Christian Education Committee, reported.

VOTED: To receive the report. (Report attached to these minutes).

Rev. Aubrey W. Hedrick reported as Chairman of the OCWM and Stewardship Committee. Sixty-four churches met their OCWM goals. Five did more than this. It was stated that our Western North Carolina Association churches contributed more than one half of the monies received by our conference.

VOTED: To adopt the report.

Rev. Henry J. Meier, Chairman of the Committee on Evangelism reported. (The report is attached).

VOTED: To adopt the report.

William W. Greenland reported for the Budget and Finance Committee. Mr. Greenland gave his report as Treasurer and presented the proposed budget for the coming year. (A copy of each is attached to these minutes).

The Rev. George Gay, Jr. asked that we publish the budget earlier than the other minutes and that copies of it be sent to the churches.

VOTED: To adopt the budget.

Chairman Harold Myers reported for the Church Extension Committee. He urged all churches to concern themselves with the matter of church extension. He announced that this committee would not presently consider organizing any new church without considering the community thoroughly and doing this with other interested denominations. Mr. Myers further urged that our churches have members participate in a large way in the Church Builders Club.

VOTED: To receive this report.

The Rev. Edwin Alcorn reported that Conference Overseas Program with Mexico and Honduras was not working out because Honduras was not interested at the time. Other fields are being considered.

The Local Church in God's Mission Committee did not have a report, but Harold Myers gave some information about how the Heidelberg Church of Thomasville progressed in their study. He stated that preparation for the program was most important. This church decided to use a 6-weeks period following Christmas 1967. Twenty-seven members of the Church representing all phases of the church's life were personally contacted. They were asked to give 2 hours a night for six Sunday nights. Worship, dialogue, summaries, etc., were part of the plan. Results of the Study were sent to all members of the church. Mr. Myers thought the program was most helpful. Most of his people considered the six-week period too short. Mr. Myers said that much follow-up is needed.

There was no report available from our Christian Social Action Committee at our meeting because the Rev. George Fidler had left our conference.

Mr. Willie Everhart, President of the Churchman's Fellowship reported. Three groups have met twice. Work is going forward toward getting the men of our Association organized into one group and operating individually as a unit. Our men are working on projects like the Blowing Rock Assembly Grounds, our Retirement Home, etc.

Mrs. Thomas Madren reported for the Church Women of our Association. They have adopted rules, elected officers, etc. They have held workshops during the year. A meeting of the Women will be held in Lexington, November 11, 1968.

Dr. Earl Danieleley, President of Elon College, brought greetings from Elon College.

Mr. Howard Regan, Superintendent of Nazareth Children's Home, reported on the Home. He said the Board of Managers was going to ask the churches to consider giving \$3.00 per member annually to the support of the Nazareth Children's Home. Nazareth Home is not in the Conference budget. The churches will of necessity have to give more generously to the support of these homes if their work is to go forward unimpeded.

The Rev. Lawrence Leonard reported on the United Church Retirement Home. Mr. Leonard gave us a brief history of this work. The Home is now incorporated and gifts to the Home are tax deductible.

Mr. J. W. Abernathy is the generous benefactor of the Retirement Home. He has agreed to match gifts to the Home dollar for dollar. Mrs. Abernathy is to give the land. (It is located on N. C. Highway 16 toward Charlotte). More than \$412,000.00 has been received thus far. We need to raise \$260,904.40 to meet Mr. Abernathy's challenge. Mr. Leonard said there is more than \$61,000.00 in unpaid pledges. He urged strong participation in the program for our Retirement Home.

Dr. George Dillinger reported on the Blowing Rock Assembly Grounds. He urged that more people use the facilities there. He said five conferences were held there in 1968 but more are expected in 1969. Blowing Rock Assembly Grounds has a mortgage of \$30,000.00.

Several announcements followed.

The meeting adjourned at 3:25 p.m.

**CHANGES IN THE BY-LAWS  
OF THE WESTERN NORTH CAROLINA ASSOCIATION OF THE  
SOUTHERN CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST, INC.**

**ARTICLE III** — Section 5 (paragraph 15)

A minister retiring from the active ministry by reason of age, disability, or health shall not forfeit his ministerial standing in this Association.

**ARTICLE V**—Section 2 (paragraph 27) **Committee on Nominations**

At least six months prior to the meeting of the Association the Executive Committee shall appoint a Committee on Nominations composed of at least five members. No officer or employee shall be eligible to serve on the Committee. The Committee on Nominations shall submit nominations for officers and committees to the Annual Meeting of the Association. It shall submit two or more names for each office and for members of the Executive Committee.

**ARTICLE V**—Section 3 (Paragraph 28) **Elections and Terms of Office**

1. The President and the Vice-President shall be elected at the Annual Meeting of the Association for a term of two years beginning at the adjournment of the meeting in which they are elected and to continue until their successors are elected and installed. They shall not succeed themselves.

3. The elected members of the Executive Committee shall be elected for a term of two years. They are eligible for re-election but shall not serve more than two consecutive full-terms.

4. Committee members shall be elected at the Annual Meeting for a term of two years. One-half of the committee shall be elected at each annual meeting.

## PRESIDENT'S REPORT — APRIL 22, 1969

### THIRD ANNUAL MEETING OF CHURCH WOMEN OF SOUTHERN CONFERENCE VIRGINIA BEACH, VA.

Let me share with you, in summary, some of the activities which have taken place during the past year. The organizational meeting of Church Women of Southern Conference was on November 12, 1966; this makes us less than three years old.

During 1968-69 we have made available—with your help—an up-to-date mailing list. This enables us to have better communications. Two letters with promotional and informational enclosures have been sent to local churches. The Executive Board met three times: June, September, and February. The three standing committees (Budget, Nominations, Summer Conference) have convened and functioned during the year. The duties of officers of Church Women of Southern Conference were defined at the Board meeting in September. Working Rules were reviewed. Persons were appointed to fill vacancies of unexpired offices, when possible.

Summer Conference was attended by approximately 150 women in June, 1968 at Elon College. Fall enrichment meetings in the three areas, with musical missionary Howard Anderson as our main speaker, were inspirational. Offerings totaling \$281.32 were given to be used in his work in Mexico. We have learned these offerings provided a scholarship which made it possible for a student to attend sacred music school in Mexico. A total number of 359 attended these inspirational programs.

Twenty creative religious banners were designed under the direction of Mrs. James Lightbourne, Jr., and used during the World Ministries Board Meeting in Greensboro, N. C. in November, 1968. They contributed much to the devotional atmosphere of the meeting. Other Women's groups may find this a meaningful experience in the making and using of these banners.

Our relationship with Church Women United has been maintained in North Carolina and Virginia.

Printed stationery was secured with the names and addresses of our officers.

Mrs. Robert Smith, Treasurer, prepared a list of all churches who have contributed to our Operating Fund Budget. This list has been sent to each local church. Approximately 48% of our 401 churches in Southern Conference have made contributions (as of February 1969). In our less than three years of life, this is the largest number of churches who have helped with these expenses. We hope more churches will find it possible to participate in the future.

Eleven Spring Laity Workshops have been or will be carried out in April and May of 1969; some in each of our three areas. Program opportunities are explained and ideas shared at these workshops.

\$600 was given to the Retirement Home Fund during the past year.

As we reflect on the past year, we are glad to count our blessings and accomplishments. As we look ahead, we face the challenge and anticipation of gaining some of our goals: a better understanding of one another; Christian folk working together; becoming better acquainted and increasing our abilities to witness as church women in today's world.

## ANNUAL REPORT EASTERN NORTH CAROLINA CHURCH WOMEN

The Executive Committee of Eastern North Carolina Church Women met at Trinity Church, Garner, N. C., March 2, 1968 for an organizational meeting with nine members and two visitors present. Working Rules were discussed. Mrs. Lowell Smoot, Treasurer, announced the receipt of \$150 working funds from the Church Women of Southern Conference. Each district representative was assigned the immediate task of preparing up-to-date mailing lists of contact women in local churches. It was decided that each District Representative would call a local presidents' meeting for purposes of acquaintance, fellowship, education and sharing. After discussion of the effectiveness of program materials now available from Council of Lay Life and Work, a plea was registered for materials written on a simpler vocabulary level. The Retirement Home of the United Church of Christ was suggested as a possible recipient of special offerings.

On October 12, five members of the Executive Committee were present at Trinity Church, Garner, to complete arrangements for the Annual Meeting, November 8 at Durham. Several recommendations were voted concerning financial policy and additions to Working Rules. The Treasurer reported Total Receipts of \$165, Disbursements of \$97.77, and a balance of \$67.23.

It was voted to publish a handbook for the Eastern N. C. Women containing a directory of officers, local presidents, Working Rules, financial policies, spring workshop dates and places.

## WORKING RULES

of the

### Churchmen's Fellowship of the Southern Conference

1. The name of this organization shall be The Churchmen's Fellowship of The Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ.
2. The purpose of the Fellowship shall be to promote men's work throughout the Southern Conference in cooperation with the Conference Committee on Lay Life and Work.
3. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer. The President and Treasurer shall be elected for a term of two years. The Vice-President and Secretary in 1969 shall be elected for a term of one year and thereafter for a term of two years. No officer shall be eligible for re-election after serving a full term.
4. There shall be an Executive Committee composed of the officers, two representatives from each Administrative Area, and the presidents of the new Association Churchmen's Fellowships when they are organized and officers are elected.  
The representatives from the areas shall be elected at the annual meeting of the Southern Conference Churchmen's Fellowship.  
In 1969 one representative from each area shall be elected for a term of one year and one representative from each area for a term of two years. Thereafter election shall be for a term of two years. No representative shall be eligible for re-election after serving a full term.
5. The Fellowship shall meet at least annually at a time and place set by the Executive Committee.
6. Each church shall be entitled to one voting delegate to the annual meeting. Churches may send additional non-voting representatives.
7. These Working Rules may be amended at any regular meeting of the Fellowship by a 2/3 vote of those present and voting.

MINUTES OF THE FIFTH ANNUAL MEETING  
of the  
SOUTHERN CONFERENCE  
of the  
UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST, INC.  
JUNE 9-10, 1970

The Fifth Annual Meeting of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ, Inc. was called to order at 2:00 p.m. on Tuesday, June 9, 1970 at Catawba College, Salisbury, N. C. by the Rev. Zanda P. Jenkins, president. The Rev. Carl T. Daye led the Conference in the singing of a hymn and in the opening prayer.

Dr. Martin L. Sholtzberger, president of Catawba College, welcomed the delegates and visitors to the campus and spoke appreciatively of the close relationship between the churches and the college.

President Zanda P. Jenkins made a brief opening statement in which he testified to the growing spirit of unity in the Conference and called upon the delegates to evidence this spirit in the sessions of the annual meeting.

The printed program was presented for adoption.

Following discussion it was:

**Voted: 1, SC '70**

That the North Carolina and Virginia Ministers for Racial and Social Justice be granted the privilege of presenting their resolutions as the first order of business of the Conference.

A motion that the elections be postponed from Tuesday afternoon to Wednesday morning failed to carry.

**Voted: 2, SC '70**

That the program be adopted as amended.

The Rev. Ronald E. Morris presented the statement and resolutions of the North Carolina and Virginia Ministers for Racial and Social Justice (Exhibit 1). Following discussion it was:

**Voted: 3, SC '70**

That the resolutions of the Ministers for Racial and Social Justice be referred to the Board of Directors; that the Board of Directors meet with representatives of the MRSJ to discuss the resolutions; and that the Board of Directors report its recommendations back to the annual meeting during the sessions on Tuesday. (It became impossible for this time schedule to be met and the Board of Directors reported back on Wednesday morning.)

The Rev. Van D. Grimes, chairman, presented the report of the Nominating Committee.

**Voted: 4, SC '70**

That the report of the Nominating Committee be received and the names placed in nomination for the office designated.

Nominations were made from the floor for various offices.

**Voted: 5, SC '70**

That nominations be closed and the names of those persons nominated by the Nominating Committee and from the floor be placed on the printed ballot.

The Rev. Dr. Howard E. Spragg, executive vice president of the United Church Board for Homeland Ministries was introduced. Dr. Spragg addressed the annual meeting on the work of the agency he leads.

The delegates and visitors were then divided into groups to attend interest groups on Catawba College, Elon College, Elon Home for Children, Nazareth Children's Home, United Church Retirement Home and Uplands Retirement Center and Nursing Home. The interest groups were led by Dr. Martin L. Shotzberger (president, Catawba), Dr. J. Earl Danieley (president, Elon), Dr. W. W. Snyder (executive director, Elon Home), Howard Regan (superintendent, Nazareth), the Rev. Lawrence Leonard (chairman of the Board of Trustees, United Church Retirement Home) and the Rev. Wayne Peck (executive director, Uplands).

At 5:00 p.m. the delegates assembled and the elections were held. There being no contest for the office of Conference Minister it was:

**Voted: 6, SC '70**

That the secretary cast a unanimous ballot for the election of the Rev. Dr. James H. Lightbourne, Jr. for a second four year term as Conference Minister.

The sessions were then recessed for the evening meal.

## **TUESDAY NIGHT — June 9**

At 7:30 p.m. a period of Singing of Hymns was held in the Omwake-Dearborn Chapel under the direction of Donald Trexler, director of music at the Congregational United Church of Christ, Greensboro, N. C. Mrs. Trexler, organist for the church, was at the organ.

The Rev. Edwin M. Alcorn, the Rev. Zanda P. Jenkins and the Rev. James H. Lightbourne, Jr., were liturgists for the service of worship. The Rev. Karlton C. Johnson, Southern Region Secretary for the Stewardship Council of the United Church of Christ delivered the sermon. The choir was composed of members of choirs from churches of the Guilford District under the direction of Donald Trexler.

**WEDNESDAY — June 10**

The Conference was called to order at 9:00 a.m. by President Zanda Jenkins. Conference was led in a hymn and the morning prayer by the Rev. Carroll W. Lewis.

The Amenities Committee was appointed: Miss Ruth B. Johnson, Dr. A. L. Hook, Vance Patterson, the Rev. J. H. Hooker, the Rev. Nevin Feather and the Rev. Thomas H. Britton, chairman.

**Voted: 7, SC '70**

That we dispense with the reading of the minutes of the 1969 Annual Meeting and approve them as printed and distributed.

The election results were then announced. (See the list of Committees and Boards in this booklet).

It was requested that a letter be written the St. Andrews UCC, Henderson, N. C. confirming their status as a UCC.

The Reverend Dr. James H. Lightbourne, Jr., Conference Minister, then reported to the Conference, calling attention to matters of basic concern.

**Voted: 8, SC '70**

That the report of the Conference Minister be received with approval and commendation for his outstanding leadership.

The report of the Historical Committee, Dr. W. T. Scott, coordinator, was presented.

**Voted: 9, SC '70**

To adopt the report of the Historical Committee (Exhibit A).

In the absence of Mrs. William M. Alexander, coordinator of the Committee on Lay Life and Work, Dale Bennett presented the report.

**Voted: 10, SC '70**

To adopt the report of the Committee on Lay Life and Work (Exhibit B).

The report of the Committee on Worship and Evangelism, Rev. Carroll W. Lewis, coordinator, was presented.

**Voted: 11, SC '70**

To adopt the report of the Committee on Worship and Evangelism (Exhibit C).

The report of the Committee on Church and Ministry, Rev. Dr. George Gay, Jr., coordinator, was presented.

**Voted: 12, SC '70**

To adopt the report of the Committee on Church and Ministry (Exhibit D).

The Conference Minister then presented Mr. Hal C. Miller, member of the Executive Council of the United Church of Christ, Barre, Vermont. Mr. Miller addressed the assembly on the status of the denomination.

The 1969 Financial Statement was presented by Carlton K. Day, Treasurer.

**Voted: 13, SC '70**

To receive the 1969 Financial Statement (Exhibit E).

Carlton K. Day, Treasurer, then presented the Proposed 1971 Budget as recommended to the annual meeting by the Board of Directors.

**Voted: 14, SC '70**

To adopt the 1971 Budget as presented (Exhibit F).

The Reverend Van D. Grimes, coordinator, presented the report of the Committee on Higher Education—Health and Welfare.

**Voted: 15, SC '70**

To adopt the report of the Committee on Higher Education—Health and Welfare (Exhibit G).

The report of the Committee on Stewardship and Our Christian World Mission was presented by the Conference Minister.

**Voted: 16, SC '70**

To adopt the report of the Committee on Stewardship and Our Christian World Mission (Exhibit H).

The report of the Board of Directors recommendations on the resolutions of the Ministers for Racial and Social Justice was presented by the secretary.

The recommendations from the Board of Directors were:

1. That the title of Conference Field Associate be changed to Associate Conference Minister; and that the titles of the three Area Administrators be changed to Associate Conference Minister for Eastern North Carolina, Associate Conference Minister for Western North Carolina, and Associate Conference Minister for Eastern Virginia. (These require changes in the By-Laws of the Southern Conference).
2. That the second resolution of the N. C. & Va. MRSJ (requesting \$100,000 be set aside for "crisis monies") not be approved.
3. That the Board of Directors take under advisement the request for the establishment of an office of Black Ministries and give consideration to the functions of all staff personnel.

4. That the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors meet with the Executive Committee of the N. C. & Va. MRSJ to consider the establishment of a Conference Committee for Racial and Social Justice to study and to minister to the problems confronting black churches, and to give consideration to all other common concerns; and for the Executive Committee to report its recommendations to the next meeting of the Conference Board of Directors.

Voted: 17, SC '70

That the four recommendations be voted on individually.

Voted: 18, SC '70

To postpone action until after lunch.

The Conference then recessed for lunch following general discussion on the recommendations.

#### WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON — June 10

The Conference was called to order at 1:45 p.m. by President Jenkins. B. J. Grant led the hymn and prayer. Action was then resumed on the recommendations from the Board of Directors.

Voted: 19, SC '70

To adopt Recommendation # 1.

Voted: 20, SC '70

To refer Recommendation # 2 to the process defined in Recommendation # 4.

Voted: 21, SC '70

To adopt Recommendation # 3.

Voted: 22, SC '70

To adopt Recommendation # 4.

Voted: 23, SC '70

That the original proposals of the NC & Va MRSJ and the statement of the Rev. Ronald Morris be made a part of the minutes of the annual meeting. (Exhibit I).

On behalf of the Executive Committee, Mr. Bennett presented the recommendations in respect to the overtures from Second United Church of Christ, Lexington, N. C. and other supporting churches.

Voted: 24, SC '70

That the Overture in reference to the election of General Synod Delegates be approved in principle and that it be referred to the Board of Directors for study and for report to the 1971 Annual Meeting to provide for the election in 1972 of the delegates to the 1973 General Synod. (Exhibit J).

Voted: 25, SC '70

That the Overture in reference to the Committee on Budget and Finance not be approved. (Exhibit K).

The Reverend Richard N. Rinker, Minister of Christian Education and coordinator of the Committee on Christian Education presented the report of the committee.

Voted: 26, SC '70

To adopt the report of the Committee on Christian Education. (Exhibit L).

The Rev. James D. Riddle, coordinator of the Committee on Christian Social Action, presented the report of the committee.

Voted: 27, SC '70

To adopt the report of the Committee on Christian Social Action. (Exhibit M).

The Rev. G. Harold Myers, coordinator of the Committee on Church Extension, presented the report of the committee.

Voted: 28, SC '70

To adopt the report of the Committee on Church Extension. (Exhibit N).

The Rev. Dr. Samuel W. Wiley, executive secretary of the North Carolina Council of Churches, was presented. Dr. Wiley spoke concerning the work of the Council. He also called attention to the fact that the Rev. Collins S. Kilburn, a ministerial member of the Southern Conference serves on the executive staff of the Council and that the Rev. James H. Lightbourne, Jr. was recently elected president of the North Carolina Council of Churches.

Two resolutions were then presented for action by the Christian Social Action. Following discussion it was:

That the Board of Directors bring a proposed amendment to the Constitution and By-Laws of the Southern Conference for early action in the 1971 Annual Meeting providing that full delegate status be granted to Directors of Christian Education in the Southern Conference who have been certified by the Division of Christian Education of the United Church of Christ.

**Voted: 32, SC '70**

That the Southern Conference approve the proposed amendments to the Constitution of the United Church of Christ. (Exhibit Q).

The Rev. Thomas H. Britton, chairman, presented the report of the Amenities Committee.

**Voted: 33, SC '70**

That the report of the Amenities Committee be adopted. (Exhibit R).

The Conference was adjourned by prayer. It is anticipated the 1971 Annual Meeting will be held on Tuesday and Wednesday, June 8-9, 1971 at Elon College, Elon College, N. C.

##### **REPORT OF THE HISTORICAL COMMITTEE**

## **EXHIBIT (B)**

### **REPORT OF COMMITTEE FOR LAY LIFE AND WORK**

This Committee had two meetings during the year to hear reports of activities of the past year, evaluate these activities and make plans for the current year. The Committee for Lay Life and Work is the conference-wide planning committee for coordinating the work of lay people as they seek to witness effectively for Jesus Christ in all areas of their lives. In this conference much, but not all, of the work of lay people is carried on through the Churchmen's Fellowship and the Churchwomen's Fellowship. The Committee for Lay Life and Work is responsible for planning leadership opportunities for laymen and lay women as well as certain other responsibilities including Mission Education.

Dr. James H. Lightbourne, Jr., Conference Minister, is the staff person that works most closely with this committee. Mrs. F. C. Lester, Associate Secretary for the Council of Lay Life and Work who serves the Southeast, lives in High Point. We have been most fortunate in having her assistance and leadership in many ways.

#### **Laity Retreats**

A Laity Retreat was held at Franklinton Center March 13-15, 1970. Mr. Charles Patterson served as Chairman. This was a very successful event with 81 people participating. The theme was "Reach Me."

A Laity Retreat was held at Blowing Rock last July. Another is planned for July 24-26 of this year. Dale Bennett is the chairman.

This year, for the first time, a Laity Retreat was sponsored by the two Lay Life and Work Committees of the Virginia Acting Associations. This was held at Roslyn, an Episcopal Conference Center in Richmond, Virginia on September 28-29, 1969. Reverend Percel Alston of the Division of Christian Education and Reverend David Jamieson of the Council for Lay Life and Work were the leaders. Reverend Dwight Moore was the chairman. Another is planned for September 18-20, 1970.

### **Laity Workshops**

A Southeastern Regional Workshop on "Planning" was held March 6-8 at Camp Carson near Atlanta, Georgia. Several people from this Conference attended. Mr. Hansel (Hank) Hollingsworth of Chapel Hill and a member of this Conference Lay Life and Work Committee was the leader of this meeting. Meetings on program planning were then planned for numerous program districts throughout the conference. Rev. Dwight Moore, Rev. Banks Shepherd and Rev. Max Vestal each were responsible for convening the planning teams for their respective Associations. At the time this report was compiled, all of these meetings at the program district level had not been held so that a final report as to numbers attending is not available.

### **Material Aid**

Mrs. Page Richardson has served most ably as Chairman of Material Aid. In addition to the routine publicizing of material aid opportunities, she sent out a special appeal for help to people of the Biloxi Back Bay Mission area who were affected by Hurricane Camille. This was well supported by churches throughout the conference.

### **Mission Education**

Mission education is carried on in the conference in a variety of ways by the many churches. Program materials carry much information about both foreign and homeland missions. The members of the Committee for Lay Life and Work are responsible for working with the Conference Staff in scheduling mission speakers in the churches of their areas when these people are available.

### **Laity Sunday And Family Thank Offering**

With the help of the Conference Office, this committee is responsible for the promotion and distribution of materials relating to Laity Sunday and Family Thank Offering.

### **Family Camping Weekend**

A Family Camping Weekend was held on September 20-21, 1969 at John's River Camp. Mr. William Starr was Chairman. Another similar event is planned for September 11-13, 1970.

### **Churchmen's Fellowship**

The Churchmen's Fellowship of the Southern Conference elected Mr. William Starr as the President last year. Mr. Starr resigned and was suc-

ceeded by the First Vice President, Mr. Earl Parker. This organization is having an Annual Meeting in connection with the Southern Conference Annual Meeting in June.

On August 22-23, 1969, forty-four men and twelve women attended the closing session of the Southern Synodical Federation of the Churchmen's Fellowship. This has now become the Churchmen's Fellowship of Western North Carolina Association.

### **Church Women**

Mrs. Thomas Hamilton has served most capably as President of the Southern Conference Church Women. This organization sponsors the Woman's Summer Conference each year. Last summer it was held at Catawba College on June 17-19, Mrs. John Fox and Mrs. Leo Luther were co-chairmen. The theme was "Reconciliation." Mr. Martin Bailey, Editor of the United Church Herald and author of one of the resource books, was the guest leader. 176 people attended this outstanding conference. The 1970 Summer Conference is scheduled for June 23-25 at Elon College. Mrs. Coleman Hargrove is chairman. Reverend William Slater from the National Staff will be the guest leader. He is the author of a guide on the theme for the year. The theme for the summer conference is "How the Word Gets Around."

Three hundred and forty three women attended the three Fall Enrichment Meetings held in November by the Churchwomen's Fellowship. District Fellowship Meetings were held in March of this year with a good response from the women. A Weekend Leadership Training Program was held at Camp New Hope for new officers on November 21-22, 1969. Mr. Hansel (Hank) Hollingsworth was the resource person who led the conference. An Annual Meeting is planned to precede the Annual Meeting of the Southern Conference.

### **EXHIBIT (C)**

#### **REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM AND WORSHIP**

The major conference-wide activity of the committee during the year was the annual Church Music Workshop held at the Blowing Rock Assembly Ground in July. Dean Fletcher Moore, of Elon College, is chairman of the committee which handles this activity. The workshop will be held again this year at the Blowing Rock Assembly Grounds July 16-19.

The Rev. Billy Joe Leonard, Lexington, N. C., found it necessary to resign as coordinator of the committee earlier this year. The rest of this report covers the activities of the three association committees.

#### **Western North Carolina**

Your committee has sought to be active in the two areas of responsibility assigned to it, that is, evangelism and worship.

Accordingly, the following projects were carried out with reasonable success. On February 4, 1970, a folk mass worship service was held at Catawba College Chapel with Dr. Donald Selby, professor in the religion department as a resource leader, assisted by a group of college students. This service illustrated ways in which newer forms of worship can be conducted, generally termed contemporary worship. This service of worship sought basically to build upon older, traditional modes of worship, filling this structure with new content, expressed in a contemporary way to speak to man's age today. This service was attended by well over 300 people. Dr. Selby further conducted lectures on a seminar basis for the ministers of the area on April 6, 7 and 27, 1970 for an hour and a half each time. These lectures were the basis for a worship seminar discussion on worship, beginning with worship in ancient days, in the early church, and up to modern times. These lectures were attended by approximately 12 ministers.

In terms of evangelism, two workshops were held in different areas of the association in the month of April, 1970. On April 5th, at Mt. Zion Church, China Grove, one session was held with your chairman and Dr. Clyde Fields as resource leaders. Fifteen churches were represented at this session with an attendance of 57 people. The second session was held April 26th at First Reformed UCC Church in High Point. Again 15 churches were represented with 38 people in attendance. The resource leaders were Rev. Dan Jones, Jr. and Dr. Clyde Fields. In both meetings methods of evangelism were discussed, how to carry on a local program of evangelism, and the Biblical basis and purpose of evangelism were explored.

Continuing plans in the fields of evangelism and worship are being made for additional projects in fall and winter of 1970-71.

### **Eastern Virginia**

The Evangelistic task is near the center of the very being of the church. From study of the New Testament we know that to be a Christian Church is to be an Evangelistic and a Worshipping Church. Too often in the past, we have had the word without the act. We are endeavoring to move into the act.

The work of the Committee on Evangelism and Worship has centered around the following major projects: a packet of materials was sent to each local church in Eastern Virginia with suitable materials for a Board of Deacons or a Committee on Evangelism and Worship to use. Helps in lay visitation, prayer groups, study groups, preaching missions, new methods of worship, etc. were included.

A School of Evangelism was held at the Suffolk Christian Church in the fall. 136 people attended from our area. Dr. Carl Sanders gave the keynote address entitled "Proclaiming God's Truth in Today's Way"; Dr. Warren Matthews led a workshop on "Small Groups Functioning Effectively"; Rev. John Lackey lead a workshop on "Perspectives in Worship."

We are encouraging youth and adults to write new hymns and gospel songs and to write new words to popular tunes. We hope this will be effective.

Tentative plans are in the making for an area wide workshop on Worship and Evangelism for October 11. Emphasis will be placed on the following:

1. Youth—A workshop geared especially to our Jr. Hi and Sr. Hi youth.
2. Study Groups—The Church membership broken into small fellowship groups for rich learning experiences.
3. Music in Worship—An outstanding leader will assist us in this field.

We are concerned about inactive church members and hope we can share some helps to the churches in this area. We have discussed the possibility of a retreat for the clergy; A day for study, prayer and fellowship. We endeavor to cooperate with the Division of Evangelism of the Virginia Council of Churches in the ministry in parks, fairs, resort areas, etc.

We look to the future with optimism and trust that this area of our Church life will be very vital in our Association and Conference.

### **Eastern North Carolina**

Our committee has 10 members representing the 6 Program Districts of the Association and has held 2 full meetings during 1970. Our committee proposed and the Association adopted a program on Evangelism for Lent under the title "Lenten Happenings in Evangelism and Worship 1970."

A Suggested Lenten 1970 Participation Form was mailed to all churches as follows:

#### **WORSHIP**

1. Enlist members to read one chapter from book of Acts each day.
2. Encourage grace at meals.
3. Involve youth and children in Sunday Services.
4. Have Family Night Supper.
5. Enlist attendance at church and church school as family units.
6. Have Lenten Study of "Hymns and Worship."

#### **WITNESS**

1. Provide study session for youth and adults on "meaning of faith."
2. Provide opportunity for youth and adults to witness at worship services.
3. Arrange and sponsor Lay Witness Week-end (see Tidings Materials).
4. Arrange and sponsor Youth Happening Weekend.

#### **OUTREACH**

1. Conduct Pastor's Class or Confirmation Class.
  2. Make community survey for potential members.
  3. Initiate or stimulate a Lay Visitation Program on regular basis.
  4. Have Lenten Preaching Mission—or special Lenten Services.
  5. Concentrate on UCC Emphasis—"Local Church in God's Mission."
- L—ove your neighbor for Christ's sake.

E—xperience the real joy of sharing your faith.

N—ever assume that God plays favorites; He loves us all.

T—ake Lent seriously as a time of new commitment.

Following Lent, the Committee requested a report from all churches who participated in the program. From the 32 report forms returned, several church bulletins and several letters the committee found: 63 instances where churches shared in the Worship Suggestions; 20 instances where Churches shared in the Witness Suggestions; and 30 instances where the Churches shared in the Outreach Suggestions; making a total of 113 participations in some form.

The committee recruited attendance for the Church and Community Seminar held by the North Carolina Council of Churches; the State Wide Conference on Evangelism held by the North Carolina Baptist Convention in Greensboro; the Youth Folk Mass at Catawba College. Dr. Clyde Fields participated in two Conferences on Evangelism sponsored by the Western Association. Rev. H. Winfred Bray participated in a "Cluster Type Clinic on Evangelism" held by the Virginia Valley Association. He and Rev. Harold Myers will share insights and recommendations for consideration at the next meeting of our full committee.

Our committee calls on Pastors to make available to members of congregations a brochure or leaflet giving some suggestions for worship and church support during the vacation and summer season.

The committee would encourage pastors and church members to give serious consideration to the rather complex question of church attendance and church support during the summer season and to the growing mobility of church members who spend increasing number of week-ends at recreation resorts.

The committee plans to make a study of various methods of providing worship service opportunities at recreation centers.

#### EXHIBIT (D)

#### REPORT OF THE CHURCH AND MINISTRY COMMITTEE

The economic, cultural, theological, liturgical, organizational, and attitudinal wide diversity of the communities and organized churches which make up the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ makes it mandatory that Church and Ministry Committees deal realistically with this problem as it affects ministerial leadership for the churches.

Our churches are of different notions concerning the problem. Many of our churches and ministers hold notions differing concerning solutions. Some of the churches and ministers are not even sure there is a problem and would wonder about our concern.

For the majority of the churches and the majority of the ministers the question of proper ministerial leadership would be answered by following the normal procedure outlined in the "Manual on the Ministry" of the United Church of Christ. This means college and seminary degrees and ordination

indicating the completion of required academic preparation. It goes without question that this is, and should be, the norm for ministerial leadership for churches in our time.

116 Churches of the Southern Conference at the present time are not so fortunate as to be in a position to enjoy the services of a minister who meets the norm required for UCC Ordination and provide the financial support and a parsonage, either as single churches or part of a parish, which is and should be the norm for financial support of a minister who meets the norm and serves full time. For these churches we must bear a burden of concern.

It must also be said, rather candidly, that even if ministers were available who had college and seminary degrees, that, for some of the churches in the above category, such a minister could not get called and would be handicapped by his academic and theological outlook even if he were to get called.

How are these 116 churches being served at the present?

1. Some are being served by retired ministers.
2. Some are being served by college and/or seminary students.
3. Some are being supplied by college teachers.
4. Some are being served by ministers who are not in the regular academic preparation process. They feel divinely called but circumstances prevent college or seminary attendance. Some of these ministers have licensed or ordination status and have secured such in such training as made available.

What are some solutions?

1. For some of the churches the clear answer is to be found in grouping or merging with contiguous churches to form a viable parish. Very little success has been achieved thus far. Much work is being done.
2. For some of the churches the clear answer on any objective basis would best be found in disbanding.
3. Some churches are still of sufficient strength and too isolated to make grouping or merger desirable and these could well be served by students, retired ministers, and college teachers. This will likely be a continuing need.
4. A large number of the 116 churches can only be served by ministers who possess a sense of divine calling and the charisma demanded by the churches. The churches need to be upgraded in their understanding of mission and ministers who serve them should be upgraded in their academic preparation so as to enable such churches to become more progressive in meeting our mission.

It was for solution # 4 above that the Southern Conference Church and Ministry Committee prepared and the Southern Conference approved an Alternate Course for the non AB-BD candidate for the ministry. This course is called "The Southern Conference Course of Study."

The Committee on Church and Ministry recommends to the Association Committees on Church and Ministry that the Southern Conference Courses of Study leading to Licensure and Ordination be implemented as far as possible on the basis of the following suggestions:

- a. Through the development of special academic programs at Elon College and Catawba College.
- b. Through attendance at the Christian Bible Institute, Durham, N. C.
- c. Through the development of correspondence courses and a plan for the use of same.
- d. Through a tutorial program utilizing volunteer leaders.

The Committee on Church and Ministry further recommends:

- a. That the Eastern North Carolina Chairman and Area Minister consult with the proper officials of Elon College on the possibility of the establishment of a program at the college in the light of the previous vote.
- b. That the Western North Carolina Chairman and Area Minister consult with the proper officials of Catawba College on the possibility of the establishment of a program at the college in the light of the previous vote.
- c. That the Eastern Virginia Chairman and Area Minister explore the possibility of such an arrangement with an institution in Eastern Virginia.

## EXHIBIT (G)

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON HIGHER EDUCATION—HEALTH AND WELFARE

Your coordinator, along with Dr. and Mrs. W. W. Snyder and the Rev. Robert Kimball, attended the annual meeting of the Council for Health and Welfare Services in Washington, D. C., March 2, 3, 4, 1970. The seminars and workshops are beneficial to the coordinator, and especially to the institutional administrators who attend.

The coordinator continues to serve on the Executive Committee of the Conference Commission Chairmen, and served in 1969 on a special national public relations committee.

Your elected committee met in regular session at Holiday Inn in Burlington, N. C., February 26, 1970.

Two workshops are in the preliminary planning stages. One will deal with the ethical implications in modern medical problems. The other will explore the problem of the use and abuse of drugs and alcohol.

The Sub-Committees are working on plans for a joint meeting of the trustees from Elon College and Catawba Colleges. A similar joint meeting is proposed for the trustees of Nazareth and Elon Children's Homes.

The homes for children have now or have had building projects during the year. The College campuses continue their expansion programs.

Ground breaking services were conducted on May 3 for The United Church Retirement Home, Inc.

The Committee on Higher Education—Health and Welfare recommends:

1. That each local church and related organization continue to give liberal financial support to our established Higher Education and Health and Welfare agencies, and that prospective students be informed about Catawba and Elon Colleges.
2. That each local church and related organization continue to give liberal support toward the establishment of The United Church Retirement Home, Inc.
3. That each church establish a Committee on Higher Education—Health and Welfare Services and charge the Committee with the responsibility of securing information on agencies and institutions and services available to the citizens of their community, through our conference, The United Church of Christ, and public agencies and to explore new avenues of service for persons in their communities, whether in an institution or not.

## REPORT OF ELON COLLEGE

Educational historians will undoubtedly record this academic year as the year of "politicalization" and "confrontation." At no time in recent years have the campuses of our country been so divided or experienced such deep division of opinion. Realizing the presence of considerable dissent among students and faculty, protest leaders have chosen to promote moratoria and strikes; many campuses have been struck by violence, destruction, and death as tempers have flared and tension has spread. All of our colleges and universities have felt the effects of the protests; some have cancelled classes, others have been closed for varying periods of time. The general picture has not been good; faculties have taken action under threat, administrations have capitulated when faced with demands which would not even be considered except for the threat of disruption. These campaigns have taken their toll: studies have been interrupted, buildings have been burned, presidents have resigned or been fired, students have been killed, and institutions of higher learning have lost much of their prestige and standing as places where the truth is sought and reason prevails. To administer a church-related college which seeks to be Christian in days like these is one of the most challenging opportunities in American education.

### Enrollment

Our dormitories were filled and our enrollment in day classes showed a small increase for the fall term. There was a decrease in the spring semester.

### Physical Plant

Construction is almost complete on the new classroom-office building and we are planning to move into the building on June 15. The first floor provided badly needed administrative offices and the second and third floors have twelve classrooms and fifteen faculty offices.

The new physical education plant should be ready for use by mid-summer. The facility includes a full-size basketball court; rooms for wrestling, handball, weight training, etc.; classroom; faculty offices; and an olympic size indoor pool.

With the completion of these two buildings we reach the goal of new construction set in the long-range plan adopted by the Board of Trustees some years ago when the day school enrollment limit of 1800 was set.

### Faculty

We are continuing our efforts to improve our faculty. One of the problems

which we face is the fact that we do not have as many person with the earned doctorate as the accrediting association recommends. The "market" is highly competitive and the effects of inflation nullify a considerable percentage of the increases which we are able to give each year.

The turnover rate continues to be quite low. Only one member of our faculty this year has resigned to seek a teaching position elsewhere for the coming year. Four teachers were not asked to return. One resigned during the year for reasons of health and another is leaving the teaching profession for another line of work.

The credentials of those who have accepted our invitation to join the faculty for the coming year are better than the credentials of those who are being replaced.

### **Campaign**

We are continuing our efforts in the E4 Fund campaign for capital funds. We are still more than \$1 million short of the first phase goal of \$3 million. The successful completion of this effort will require the cooperation and assistance of all who are interested in Elon.

### **4-1-4 Calendar**

This is the second year of the 4-1-4 calendar for us. We have continued to find the plan very popular with students and faculty and believe that it is a very successful arrangement for good work. Most of us feel that the one month term allows a flexibility which is very helpful and which makes possible a number of classes and projects, such as international travel, which would not be possible with the traditional calendar.

### **Bequests**

The College has received a number of bequests during the past year. These include gifts from the estates of Miss Ethel Holmes, Mrs. Eunice E. Holland, Mrs. I. W. Johnson, Mrs. Irene B. McClenny, and Mr. W. W. Sellers.

We need to continue to emphasize the importance of remembering our churches and our church-related institutions in making our wills.

### **Future**

When I consider the unrest, uncertainty, and lack of direction in much of American higher education, I am profoundly convinced that the church-related, Christian college is vital and that its role is increasingly important.

## **REPORT OF CATAWBA COLLEGE**

It is a distinct privilege to present to the Southern Conference this report of Catawba College in this the 119th year since the college was founded. Events which have occurred during the year lead to the conclusion that

Catawba College is making great progress in its development. Programs already conceived and those envisioned for the future, when joined with historical accomplishments, provide a base for projecting greatness for the college.

In February, 1969, many recommendations were made to the Board of Trustees. The analysis which follows presents some insight into how well they were accomplished.

1. It was recommended to employ or develop five to eight terminally qualified teachers in each of the next three years.

Since last February there has been a net gain of eight faculty members holding the earned doctorate, and a net gain of four bona fide doctoral candidates. For the 1970-71 session, one person holding the doctorate has been employed and there will be at least four additional doctorate candidates.

2. It was recommended that the college employ terminally qualified people in all departmental chairs by 1970-71.

This has been accomplished, as of this date, except in the Department of Commerce and Economics.

3. It was recommended to develop a policy of faculty development at an annual cost of \$8,000 to \$10,000 per year.

Last year eighteen faculty members were awarded grants ranging from \$300 to \$2,000 for summer study and development. The Z. Smith Reynolds Foundation has funded for faculty development \$10,000 per year for the next three summers.

4. It was recommended to increase the book and periodicals appropriation substantially.

A 50% increase in this account has been appropriated, and through the generosity of the Algernon Sydney Sullivan Foundation, the Sears Roebuck Foundation, and the Price Waterhouse Foundation, these additional funds have been virtually fully provided.

5. A 100% increase in academic scholarships for the year was proposed.

A sum of \$20,000 was appropriated and funded in large part by Board President Shuford's additional gift, gifts of his beloved mother, and the return on new endowment funds provided by the college's benefactor and trustee, Dr. Julius W. Abernethy.

6. Placing head residents in all dormitories was suggested.

This, too, has been accomplished.

7. The establishment of a Counseling Center was strongly urged.

Dr. Maynard Rich and Miss Doris Kaneklides have joined to provide an able professional team to render most satisfactory counseling service to the college.

8. It was deemed necessary to establish more precise criteria of rank and to define more clearly a full-time faculty position at Catawba College.

The faculty adopted reasonable criteria for various ranks and also defined tenure criteria during its March meeting. A committee is still working toward a definition of the full-time faculty position.

9. Based on the interest of the Development Office and recommendation of Dr. Robert Stuhr, it was proposed to establish an Advisory Board.

A special committee of the Board of Trustees studied this proposal and has recommended that a Presidential Board of Advisors be established. The committee also proposed an outline of organization for such a board. This proposal has been accepted and approved by the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees. As yet, the Advisory Board has not been fully established.

10. The office of Dean of Admissions was proposed last February.

Immediately upon approval, Marion M. Richards was promoted to Dean of Admissions and Registrar. In June, the position of Vice President of Academic Affairs and Dean of the College was approved. Dr. Charles Turney holds this position.

11. Finally, a recommendation was made to improve, rather substantially, the fringe benefits and salary scales for faculty, as well as those of staff and hourly employees.

This recommendation was rather fully implemented, as you well know, with substantial benefit to those employed by the college, as well as to the institution itself.

Experts in the field of managing by objectives contend that, as a rule, only three to five new objectives can effectively be achieved in a year by an institution. While all of the above improvements do not constitute major objectives, most do, and that they could be effected in such a time period borders on the remarkable. To achieve them so well obviously required the greatest of effort by all of those within the college—the Board of Trustees, the administration, the faculty, the staff, and, in fact, the students.

In regard to the Development program of the college, based on success to date in the Catawba Challenge, it is conceivable that the goal of \$5,000,000 may well soon be reached. In order to achieve and fully implement all objectives of the Challenge, an additional half million dollars will be needed. Almost three-quarters of a million dollars has been raised since February, 1969. The rate of new funds being pledged has been reduced somewhat.

One of the most gratifying aspects of Phase III of the Challenge has been the splendid response of the western Association of the Southern Conference of the United Church of Christ. Nearly \$100,000 has been pledged by approximately fifty churches.

Fundamental to the immediate future of the college is completion of the Catawba Challenge—first through the raising of the originally planned \$5,000,000, and second, by raising an additional half million dollars. This extra effort is not a new campaign, but is essential to achieve the basic, defined objectives set forth in the original proposal. To fulfill these objectives, an "additional mile" must be traversed. Support of all the college's constituents is solicited.

In addition, efforts must be extended to enhance the overall quality of the college, especially academically. To achieve this, it will be necessary to increase the flow of current operating funds substantially. Since the 1967-68 fiscal year, the total operating budget of the college has increased, through 1969-70, almost \$700,000 -- almost one-third in two years. Of this sum, students, through increased fees, have been required to bear less than \$175,000 of this burden. Friends of the college and Federal grants have given more than one-half million dollars to the development of academic strength, plus, of course, funds for endowment and physical expansion. Next year it is anticipated that the operating budget will be increased \$250,000. It is mandatory that tuition fees be increased to help offset this increase.

An overt policy has been followed of developing the college through resources other than student fees, in so far as possible. It was felt inappropriate to charge students so as to build the college. Catawba College is a stronger college now than it was two years ago, and is justified to increase its fees to students.

Every effort should be exerted to complete the Physical Education Center and to begin construction of the badly needed Student Center.

The Estate Planning function must be initiated along with the Presidential Board of Advisors.

Immediately beyond the upcoming year are such needs as: a men's dormitory, possible housing for married students, planning for utilization of vacated space in the Hedrick Administration Building upon completion of the Student Center, and planning for use of Claremont Hall and Foil House upon completion of the men's dormitory. Assuming full subscription to the goals of the Catawba Challenge, it is conceivable that these needs may be met in the next two years.

In addition to these physical facilities problems, considerable thought must be given to operating budget requirements for the next several years. Substantial increases must be made in salaries and in department budgets.

Beyond these intermediate needs, the long-run future requirements include a much larger endowment, additional space for fine arts, the sciences, and the library. Implicit in this, naturally, is a much expanded operating budget.

The specific directions and goals of the college for the next fiscal year are farly well identified. The intermediate goals are less explicit, and the long-run future of the college, while bright, is not at this time precise.

How does one put into summary form the accomplishments of Catawba College? It is virtually impossible to do so with precision when viewing one hundred nineteen years of history. Over this span there have been times when the very existence of the college was threatened. Yet, through dedicated leadership, sacrificial support, and faith on the part of thousands of people, Catawba College has not only existed, but has come to a point in time in which she flourishes. As suggested before, (if you will permit the first person) when I was elected the Sixteenth President of Catawba College, I saw here fundamental strength, a dedication to the college, and a permeating will-

ingness to develop this institution into not just a good college, but a great college. In March of 1968 I saw this as a possibility. Now just two years later, I view Catawba College greatness as a developing reality, and soon, a surety.

## REPORT OF THE ELON HOME FOR CHILDREN

The past year has been a good one for the Elon Home for Children as it moved ahead in a variety of ways to makes its program adequate to meet the needs of the boys and girls entrusted to its care.

Institutional care, day care, foster home care, and after care are provided for the boys and girls in the Home. To administer the program in these areas, the executive director has directors of social service, child care, and day care. Through weekly conferences with each of these, he keeps in touch with everything done, gives guidance and counsel.

At the writing of this report, there were 70 children in group care, which is our capacity. The break-down on this shows that 45% have both parents living, 39% are half orphans, and 16% are full orphans.

Following are some highlights of the past year:

The campus took on a new look when the old white building was razed to make way for the McFarland Activities Building which will be erected on the site. The white building, constructed in 1907, was the first on the campus.

We entertained three groups of young people from churches in Connecticut in the Spring. Each stayed for a week. They did a great deal of painting while here, but there was plenty of time left over for making friends and we enjoyed having them.

For the first time in the history of the Home, all members of the child care staff and most members of the administrative staff attended at least one week of the Chapel Hill workshops for child care workers.

Dr. Alan-Keith-Lucas of the School of Social Work of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill was speaker for Alumni Day and Homecoming on April 27. More than 200 alumni and other friends attended, enjoying the program, the fellowship, and the luncheon which was served at Wisseman Cottage.

Several greatly appreciated bequests were received in the year. Among those remembering the Home in their wills were B. J. Vestal of Alanance County, whose gift amounted to \$9,940.54, Volney B. Carpenter of Waverly, Virginia, who left the Home \$2,500, and Mrs. M. B. Smith of Burlington, whose gift was \$1,000.

The first couple was employed by the Home as houseparents for older boys. We welcomed Mr. and Mrs. Simon P. Stone, Sr., to this position on

our staff. They came here from a children's home in Baltimore, Maryland, and prior to that had been on the staff of Barium Springs Home for Children.

A copy of the Annual Report for 1969 will be given to each individual attending the Southern Conference. This report will give a complete picture of our activities as well as our finances for 1969.

## REPORT OF THE NAZARETH CHILDREN'S HOME

June 9, 1970

This report will include information some of which covers the fiscal year 1968-1969, and some covering the calendar year 1969. In either case we are happy to report another good year at Nazareth Home.

We have tried as always to meet as many as possible of the total needs of the children who come into our care. At Nazareth an effort is made to make our institution much like family life, providing the basic food, clothing, shelter, health care, work experience, education, a religious experience, social and other opportunities, all of which work toward the responsible, happy and healthy child.

When we say "like a family," obviously we have to think big with regard to any of our many concerns for 62 children is indeed a big family. While we on the staff can never be the real parents, in our substitute parent role, we must somehow provide the mother and father image that every child must find in someone.

By far the most exciting experience for children and staff in 1969 was completion of our new building complex consisting of two cottages for girls, central dining hall and administration building. Although we have occupied these buildings for several months, they were formally dedicated on June 7, 1970. These modern, comfortable and adequate quarters have been a real boost to our program. While the campus facilities have taken on a new look we

have taken a look at ourselves and as a result have started a program of staff sessions. Our Executive Committee in searching for a more effective staff training program has employed a specialist in this field to hold 2 day meetings each month here on our campus. This plan makes it possible for all staff members to attend and it gives our instructor opportunity to observe the staff and children. We have had only one such session to date but we can see this as a worthwhile venture.

The farm, which provides a work experience for the boys and also contributes support to the institution in the way of vegetables and meats had a fairly good year; we have had better years in vegetables. A fine beef cattle herd provided more than sufficient beef for our use; 6,500 pounds, much of it in the form of ground beef for hamburgers, the favorite of most children. Pork produced amounted to about 6,000 pounds. Hay and other feed crops are produced on our farm also.

The boys also assist the farm and maintenance supervisor in the upkeep of buildings and grounds which on a 295 acre tract is quite a task, however a task which they take much pride in.

Girls are not completely out of the farm efforts because it is their job to prepare the vegetables for the table and for freezing and canning.

A highlight of last summer was a youth work group week long experience with Rev. David Eusden and sixteen young people from Waterbury, Conn. They moved into our cottages with the children and lived and worked as the children do for a week. Several extra activities were sponsored by these young people during their stay and proved to be a great experience for all concerned.

Twenty-seven junior and senior high students were treated to a five day coastal trip in July along with four staff members. Most of our other children attended Johns River Camp.

Each child had a two week vacation with relatives or friends plus several week ends off campus. Children without places or people to visit are provided for through our weekend parent program an experience beneficial both to the child and the sponsor.

Lyerly Memorial is our community home church and our children participate in the program of the church just as the child in the community.

We had a turnover of only nine children last year and for some of our critics this is not good. They do not have all the facts and in child care work it is not always easy to give satisfactory explanations. Very simply the reason for such little change in population is that families were just not ready for the return of children and I see no point in placing a child back into the same unstable situation from which he was removed.

Of the nine discharged last year, 2 graduated from high school, 1 married, 1 placed for adoption and 5 returned to their parents or families.

I am happy to report that a greater number will be able to leave our care this year. Two have already been placed for adoption with another scheduled

to move to adoptive parents this week, and two likely adoptions before the fall school term begins. Nine others have been returned to parents and relatives. These appear as good stable placements which will not likely re-appear as applicants for group care. In addition to these we have other good prospects for discharges. We have received 154 applications and letters requesting admission.

One boy graduated from high school and is enrolled at Wingate College. He will live with us through this summer and will return each summer while in college. \$300.00 per year has been pledged and we expect to receive much more toward educating this deserving young man.

### REPORT OF THE STEWARDSHIP—OCWM COMMITTEE

The Basic Support—Our Christian World Mission contributions of the local churches represent the major financial support for the total work of the national instrumentalities and agencies of the United Church of Christ and of the Southern Conference.

For each dollar contribution from the churches 45¢ is sent to the treasurer of the United Church of Christ to be distributed according to the national budget. 55¢ is kept to carry on the work of the Southern Conference.

In these days of rising costs and of increased needs in mission outreach, it is imperative that churches continue their generous support of Our Christian World Mission.

For 1969 14 churches met their "Challenge Goal" for OCWM. 132 churches met their "Minimum Goal" and a total of 318 churches contributed to OCWM. The churches meeting their "Challenge" and "Minimum" goals are to be highly commended.

The churches contributed a grand total of \$368,960 to OCWM for the year 1969. However, this was approximately \$12,000 less than the total received in 1968.

Your committee believes that the churches of the conference will want to increase their OCWM contributions during 1970 in order to meet the rising needs and opportunities that confront us. Our mission at home and overseas depends on our commitment and generosity.

During the year the committee coordinator, Mrs. Eugene Amick, found it necessary to resign when her husband, the Rev. Eugene Amick, changed positions. A new coordinator will be elected at the annual meeting.

Your committee recommends:

- a. That each local church accept at least the "Minimum Goal" for Basic Support—Our Christian World Mission.
- b. That each local church make regular monthly payments on Basic Support—Our Christian World Mission.
- c. That each local church strive to reach the goal of \$1 for benevolences for each \$1 spent through its local budget.

## EXHIBIT (I)

### STATEMENT AND PROPOSALS OF THE NORTH CAROLINA & VIRGINIA MINISTERS FOR RACIAL AND SOCIAL JUSTICE (N. C. & Va. MRSJ)

The North Carolina and Virginia Ministers For Racial and Social Justice who are daily confronted with the realities of the "crisis in the nation," are

deeply concerned over the non-directed participation of the Southern Conference in meeting the challenges of the crisis.

The N. C. & Va. MRSJ through Christian concern, challenge our Conference to lay aside "business as usual," and to meet the clarion call to formulate a positive strategy of reconciliation and creativity to confront the "crisis" in our area of North Carolina and Virginia.

Our Conference must be reminded that at its last Annual Meeting an attempt was made to reach out to tackle the problems that beset the poor (usually black), the downtrodden and the oppressed. The Conference wholeheartedly endorsed the resolutions of the N. C. & Va. MRSJ, and gave the "green light" to begin the long march toward meeting the needs of its constituents, who find themselves part and parcel of the crisis.

However, the Conference let loose its hands from those who seek help in the ghettos and slums of North Carolina and Virginia. It has closed its eyes to the problems of the poor black members of its composition. It has not acted positively to meet the crisis that exists within North Carolina and Virginia.

It is needless to say, but must be noted, that the Conference, through its Board of Directors does not act as if a "crisis exists" in North Carolina and Virginia when it did not provide the necessary funds to implement the spirit of the resolutions accepted by the Conference. Nor did it act responsibly in the shifting of its responsibilities to the N. C. Council of Churches. We believe in close cooperation between the various councils of churches; however, we oppose the negating of Conference responsibilities to other agencies.

The Conference has adopted an attitude that it is providing a ministry to all of its people (particularly to its black members); however, in truth such an attitude ignores the real concerns of blacks. The Conference cannot expect to meet the needs of its black constituents unless they share more meaningfully in programs and decisions that effect their own destiny. Until the Conference accepts the idea that it is a multi-racial Conference, with black persons having real concerns, needs, and aspirations, it cannot be the Church of Jesus Christ in North Carolina and Virginia.

Many Conferences throughout the UCC have responded positively to the crisis, by providing financial resources and human resources in positive and creative manners. The Southern Conference has not. We need only point to the fact that the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors did not find financial resources available to make a definitive study of the "crisis" as it exists in North Carolina and Virginia, even though they were directed to do so by this body last year.

The N. C. & Va. MRSJ will confront the Conference at every point in the months and years to come to make a truly effective witness as the church active in the world, to help eradicate the myriad of problems that affect the poor, and black of its area of ministry.

The N. C. & Va. MRSJ no longer can accept verbal commitments which do not lead to positive and concrete results. As we look about us,

we see very little signs (if any) of positive programs of ministry to its black constituents who are confronted with the problems of drug addiction, exploitive land holders, education, health, voter education, job exploitation, white racism, ghetto living, housing, and job exclusion. Many of our black churches are without adequate leadership; however, there are no Conference programs provided to meet this need. The lack of programming helps to maintain the void that exists in the relationship between blacks and whites within the Conference.

The Conference at this hour has wretchedly dragged its feet in the "crisis," in order that budgets would be met and the alienation of racists from the Conference would not occur.

The N. C. & Va. MRSJ stands firmly in the belief that the Conference can be the church if it is willing to try new and creative ways to meet the problems. Therefore, we call upon our Conference to adopt the following resolutions:

1. To immediately change the title of Conference Field Associate to Associate Conference Minister.
2. To immediately set aside or provide \$100,000 for "crisis monies" to help meet the problems within our North Carolina and Virginia areas.
3. That the office of Black Ministries be established and that immediately a secretary be hired to head this office.
4. That a Conference Committee For Racial And Social Justice be established to study, and to minister to the problems confronting black churches, and that said committee be encharged with the handling of all crisis monies, hiring of staff personnel, and related items to effect a solution to the crisis. Furthermore, we request that the majority of said Committee be black.

**STATEMENT BY REV. RONALD E. MORRIS  
ON BEHALF OF THE NORTH CAROLINA AND VIRGINIA  
MINISTERS FOR RACIAL AND SOCIAL JUSTICE**

Mr. President, distinguished visitors, members and friends of this Conference, speaking on behalf of the MRSJ of North Carolina and Virginia, we are appreciative for granting us this opportunity to express our concern to this Conference in the area of racial and social justice.

Therefore, this afternoon we would like to address an open letter to the Conference, in the hopes that together we can find mutual solutions to the problems that beset all of God's children in North Carolina and Virginia. Thus we shall begin on this wise:

We, the ministers of North Carolina and Virginia, disciples of Jesus Christ, representatives of the MRSJ of UCC, write to the churches of North

Carolina and Virginia to put into writing the concerns of black churchmen regarding our beloved Conference.

It would be an easy task to point out the many weaknesses of our Conference, and say, "this and that" ought to be done, or should be done. And to a degree we must; however, we would limit such accusations to prevent from compounding the existing weaknesses of our Conference. It is our aim to solicit a creative and meaningful response that our churches will move in Christian love to meet the challenges of the hour.

Yet we would not like to deceive the brethren with fanciful words to cover up the truth of our dilemma. For to do so would be hypocrisy of the highest sort, and such would not increase the worth of ourselves or our Conference.

Therefore, today, we write with an urgency and a hopefulness that we can "listen honestly, and act wisely" that the church will respond positively to the concerns of black churchmen.

The Southern Conference poses a dilemma to the black churchmen of its ranks. Daily we are faced with the reality of existing in urban and rural ghettos that dehumanize and destroy the moral and spiritual character of our people. We face the reality of trying to compete in a system that systematically keeps us on the margin of poverty. We face the reality of being oppressed and abused, when we quest for freedoms given to our white churchmen as a matter of course.

All of us have witnessed the disruption and destruction of a small segment of American society throughout our land. All of us have witnessed the response of fear that these events have engendered. Many of us, who have witnessed and heard the cries of our black brothers and sisters, have been moved with Christian compassion and concern to seek ways and means for rectifying their situations.

Men and women of good will within our own United Church of Christ, recognized the need to meet head on the "crisis" that plagues our nation and our homes, and sought to act positively to ease this crisis.

Within our denomination, we have designated the crisis in the nation, the number one priority and concern for our churches. We who comprise the Southern Conference have accepted this commitment, and in 1969, declared at our Annual Meeting that something positive be done. We adopted the resolutions of the MRSJ of the North Carolina and Virginia area to act in a positive manner during this crisis.

Thus after fourteen months we find ourselves disillusioned as to the honesty of our commitment.

A perusal of our efforts during this period reveals that the financial commitments of the Southern Conference to the "crisis in the nation," belie the verbal commitments that we have made.

In 1969 the churches committed only \$2,698.04 to our Neighbors In Need Offering to help finance the Commission For Racial Justice, a mere pittance as

our apportionment to meet the financial burdens of the Commission. Yet we must note, that Conference after Conference, throughout the UCC have stripped their budgets and implemented programs to meet the financial burdens that creative and productive programs require. In our Southern Conference we find this not to be the case. Direct financial expenditures to this cause in the Southern Conference totaled \$3,000 — again a mere pittance.

Thus when we write as black churchmen with a dilemma, we write with a sense of disillusionment over the seriousness of this Conference to meet its responsibilities in this crucial time.

We write in the knowledge that there is not one viable program in existence to meet the challenges that are before us. We write in the knowledge that our churches, our church-related institutions and colleges are not serious enough about the crisis since they have not instituted new and dramatic programs to aid those who are involved in the matrix of an oppressive immoral society.

Therefore, in order to end our disillusionment, and meet the challenges that beset all of us in the Southern Conference, we call upon all the churches to dramatically and forthrightly lend serious consideration and efforts to meet our responsibilities as disciples of Christ.

The MRSJ of North Carolina and Virginia are asking for financial and physical aid as the first positive steps to concretise that which we have verbally committed ourselves to in the past.

There can be no programming of note within our areas, unless we are committed to provide the necessary capital to bring them to existence.

There can be no programming unless we are willing to take the risk, of lending ourselves to an honest confrontation of the problems about us.

We are further asking of our churches to aid us in the establishment of an Office of Black Ministries, to meet the myriad of problems that beset black churches and people. We cannot believe that our white brethren, who have virtually developed in a separate society, can adequately speak to the problems of black people, no matter how sincere and honest they may be.

We are further asking of our churches to lend themselves in assisting us to establish a Committee For Racial and Social Justice to work in the area of Racial Justice in the vast areas of North Carolina and Virginia. Such a committee would reach out beyond our churches to deal with the racial and social problems that we have ignored.

It is our hopes that our effort here today, will be understood. For we fully realize, that in far too many cases, those who advocate change are looked upon as enemies by the very institutions that seek to help. We do not stand as enemies of the Southern Conference for all of us have helped to build this conference, and we believe that together we can make it the most viable and productive Conference in the UCC.

The choice as to which way we shall go, both black and white is yours. We, as ministers for racial and social justice, will not and cannot turn back

from answering the clarion call for racial and social justice in our churches, and in our Conference in North Carolina and Virginia.

What ever resources that we have, we will use in conjunction with all the resources of our Conference to effectively meet the challenges of the "crisis" in North Carolina and Virginia. We pray God, that we will be as one-man, both black and white to bear witness in Christian concern to meet and challenge the problems of our area.

**REPORT OF THE CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE**

**Children's Ministry**

Ecumenical work in Vacation Church School workshops made a beginning in 1969 and increased slightly this year with work done jointly in Greensboro and Raleigh with the Disciples of Christ. Interest in the traditional vacation

church school seems waning in several areas; on the increase is a development in the field of day camping. Our hope is to become involved in the new interest and sustain our relationships on a broader basis with other denominations working in vacation church school leadership development.

Junior age boys and girls continue to attend summer programs sponsored by the Conference in relatively large numbers. Their participation in 1969 was nearly half of the total number at camps and conferences.

### **Youth Ministry**

The Southern Conference Youth Fellowship continues to become a more effectively functioning part of districts as churches discover its possibilities. Emphasis during the year has been placed more on creative district gatherings rather than traditional mass meetings with less emphasis on content and less on fellowship.

The second annual program packet prepared for use by local groups was a virtual sellout for 1969-70; the new one, being selected now, will offer still finer resources for helping local youth fellowships provide relevant programs for senior highs.

The acceptance of last year's annual Youth Forum can best be attested to by the fact that the Youth Board agreed to again meet for the Forum June 19-21 at Catawba College following the same general theme (music-art-drama) in 1970.

Training for district leaders will be provided in the fall, during which time packet contents and SCYF program plans will be shared and explained.

### **Adult Ministry**

Campus ministry work, which is now an adjunct of this committee, is shared at several campuses in North Carolina. This ecumenical work is supported both by national and conference funds, and reaches students at North Carolina College, Duke University, University of North Carolina, Elon and Catawba (the work at A&T University is pending awaiting the selection of a new campus minister).

Several churches have made use of resources provided through the LOINT program for adult education locally, with good results. Churches are encouraged to do the same thing with the 1970-71 resources.

Experimental work is being carried on in cooperation with WFMY-TV in Greensboro to attempt to program for young adults on a regular basis with creative and relevant Sunday-morning programs. Work on the scripts is done with help from Dr. James Hull (Department of Religion and Philosophy, Greensboro College), Rev. Roderick Reinecke (Rector, Church of the Holy Comforter in Burlington) and Rev. James Morrison of the Conference staff. Hopefully the first program will be shown in June, though final commitments are still to be made.

### **Leadership Ministries**

The program attracting greatest participation and best evaluations during the past year has been LOINT (Local Opportunities in Nurturing Teachers).

This is a continuing program carried out locally by Key Leaders who have been provided with texts, guidance and outlines by the Conference. Last year Miss June Grubb, Mrs. Katherine Forbes, and Miss Dorothy Ballinger worked hard in the preparation of Guides for use in LOINT. The 1970-71 LOINT information has gone out to pastors and superintendents. Those who participated last year are invited to share again in the opportunities it will provide. Those who missed it last year need to give serious consideration to joining in helping local church school teachers acquire background, insights and increased skills in their work through LOINT.

Miss Yvonne Delk, who is on the national staff of the Division of Christian Education, now serves as our liaison person with the national division. She spent several days with churches and programs with the hope that she can stimulate participation and interest in our midst and increase our awareness of the needs of our constituency.

Curriculum workshop projections include a fall schedule to provide help for churches using United Church Curriculum.

### **Specialized Ministries**

The camp and conference program of the Conference carries along in 1970 with some of the familiar forms as well as with some new looks. A Middle High Tent Camp, a music-art-drama Kaleidoscope, and an inner city opportunity for senior highs are among the latter, as is a two-week junior high camp.

Camps continue to attract the younger age groups (junior and junior high) steadily. It is becoming more difficult to have appeal for middle high and senior high young people; this seems to be the picture across the nation. This was one reason for the new kinds of experiences being provided in 1970. Pastors are urged to become personally involved in encouraging young people to attend church-related camps.

There is always a sense of urgency about adult leadership recruitment for camps. This year is no exception. With the change in leadership standards made in 1969, some confusion has resulted in who can and who cannot serve. Simply stated, anyone who is at least twenty years old can find a place to serve as counselor. Those from 20-35 are needed at middle and senior high weeks; those from their twenties and older (ad infinitum!) are needed for junior age and junior high weeks. Our responsibility to provide mature adult leadership for our young people sometimes does not show a real concern or awareness of the need.

In 1969-70 Dr. Edward Schlingman participated in a site evaluation study of our four camp/conference facilities. As one of the foremost workers in site development and program planning he has met with concerned leaders and will return again in the fall to share further in discussions about our situation.

It has been a busy and productive year for Christian Education. The fact that innovations have been made and continue to be called for is a very healthy sign of growth. Ever aware of the increasing need to provide a relevant witness for our children, young people and adults in the NOW world, we will continue to strive for better ways and more effective ministries.

## EXHIBIT (M)

### REPORT OF THE CHRISTIAN SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE

Your Conference's Social Action Committee has chosen to highlight five areas of concern in which we hope churchmen and our churches will work in the coming year.

First, we hope that every churchman of the Southern Conference will vote in every election or referendum during the year. Further we hope that each person will encourage and enable others to vote and that everyone will become involved in the political process, from the precinct organization to the national party conventions. Those whom we elect represent us, and if they fail to represent our hopes and expectations, others can be elected in their place. The vote is the basic right and responsibility of every citizen.

Second, prison reform is long overdue, both in Virginia and North Carolina. Men and women are dehumanized rather than helped by incarceration. Prison officials, especially guards, are grossly under paid, and buildings are not remodeled and made fit places for rehabilitation. We commend the work of the North Carolina Council of Churches in this area of human need and recommend that each minister participate in at least one Prison Seminar this year sponsored by the Council. Information may be obtained by writing the Department of Social Ministry, NCCC, Route 1, Box 601-A, Morrisville, N. C. 27560.

Third, saving our environment has become a battle cry. Man was given dominion over the world, but he has too often used the world for his own purposes, selfishly, without regard for others or for future generations. Now such luxury is clearly at an end. We endorse the formation of such groups as ECOS, the Sierra Club, and others which are seeking to make us aware of how precious our environment is and how easily it can be expended through misuse. We believe that efforts to conserve vast areas of our states for conservation and public use are Christian in intent and necessary. We recommend to churches that such groups or chapters be formed at county or city levels of our Conference and that study and action in this area of concern be accelerated. For information, write to: ECOS, Box 1055, Chapel Hill, N. C. 27514.

Fourth, too many of our citizens continue to be ill-housed in spite of Federal and State programs specifically designed to enable non-profit sponsors such as churches to have a major impact on the problem. We commend those churches in Raleigh, Greensboro, Salisbury, Asheville, Lumberton, Tarboro and elsewhere, just to mention those in North Carolina alone, which have participated in efforts to build low and moderate income housing for their citizens. Major developments can be built at little or no cost to the sponsoring non-profit agency. We encourage efforts by all communities to provide decent, safe, sanitary, and humane housing also through local or county public housing authorities. For information write: Low Income Housing Development Corporation, P. O. Box 1108, Durham, N. C. LIHDC is staffed and funded to help churches and other community groups meet the housing needs of our citizens.

Fifth, the Crisis in the Nation response of the churches in the United Church of Christ continues. Each local church is asked to set a goal for itself

which equals 1-5% or more of its current local expenses. Funds received through Neighbors in Need offering can be counted as part of the goal. The Southern Conference can retain up to one-third of the total for work in the various areas of the Conference. For most churches in our Conference, such a contribution would be between \$60 and \$300 per year. Yet if each of our churches made even the minimal commitment of one percent the amount raised for Crisis in the Nation would be over \$25,000. And many of our churches could do better than the minimum suggested.

National allocations from the Commission on Racial Justice have thus far provided scholarships for non-white youth at UCC related colleges; community organization efforts in voter education, legal services, and labor disputes; and various experimental programs aimed at increasing self-determined, self-directed, and self-help projects in poor communities. Of special interest to the Southern Conference is a grant to purchase a 40 acre plot of land to build low-income housing, a co-op market, and a gasoline station for the benefit of people in the rural area around Moncure, N. C. Also, the program costs of the Reverend James Hargett, now on the staff of the Council of Church and Ministry, who is responsible for recruitment, continuing development, and placement of black clergy, have been under-written by a grant from Crisis in the Nation funds.

We commend the idea of churchmen responding to the Crisis in the Nation and we urge each church to increase its level of support for both OCWM and Crisis in the Nation. At the present time the Social Action Committee of the Conference receives requests and makes recommendations to the Board of Directors about the use of Crisis in the Nation funds within the Conference. The Crisis in the Nation at present is ripe for resolution through black determination. Obviously those who are more powerful and affluent in any society must provide the funds for others who have been denied affluence and power. Especially within the church, Christians need to develop a high level of mutual trust which will enable those most affected by the greatest evils to decide how their needs can best be met. We would support efforts to achieve local determination of how funds can best be spent.

The Commission believes that educational opportunities for local churchmen in the Southern Conference should be broadened to include the study of the theological and ethical implications of various public issues. We recommend that each church or, where possible, neighboring churches, sponsor forums and study groups on such issues as housing, racial tensions, abortion and birth control, ecology, prison reform, welfare reform, and political participation during the year 1970-71.

The Committee on Social Action will request funds from the Conference to enable at least four informational program packets to be mailed to each church during the year. In addition we recommend that books and other materials on race and black consciousness be purchased and circulated particularly in our white churches, in order that we may, to a greater extent, understand the feelings and desires of our fellow black churchmen. A list of such materials will be included in an early mailing.

We hope that the specific recommendations contained in this report will be acted on by each of our churches. In a time of conflict and difference of

opinion, the church, of all society's institutions, must not be afraid to search for the truth and speak clearly. We must learn better how to confront issues, engage in debate, and act effectively on our convictions.

## EXHIBIT (N)

### REPORT OF THE CHURCH EXTENSION COMMITTEE

During the year 1969 the Church Extension Committee of the Southern Conference and the Division of Church Extension of the United Church Board for Homeland Ministries reached agreement whereby in all mutually aided fields in the future the subsidy shall be shared on a 50%-50% basis. This is the normal procedure among the UCC Conferences.

The Rev. J. Edmund Lippy had been the staff person on the Division of Church Extension assigned as the liaison person to work with the Southern Conference. During 1969 the assignment was changed and the Rev. Milton L. Upton is now in this relationship with us.

During 1969 a total of \$28,993.24 was spent on Church Extension projects throughout the Conference. This was shared equally by the United Church Board for Homeland Ministries and the Southern Conference.

There are several items of particular interest to report concerning fields that formerly were aided. St. Peter's UCC, Greensboro, N. C. has merged with First Congregational UCC, Greensboro, to form a new interracial congregation. The new congregation will use the facilities of St. Peter's. The church is in a strategic position to minister to a neighborhood in which the racial composition is changing.

The Hawfields UCC, Mebane, N. C., and the Melville UCC, Haw River, N. C., which had formed a yoked parish, have merged to form the Melfield United Church of Christ. The new congregation plans an extensive building project at a new location to meet its growing needs. The Rev. Charles Knox, who led the congregations in the merger, will continue as pastor.

Once again last fall the Eastern Virginia Christian Missionary Association raised more than \$5,000 which was contributed to the support of the Pembroke Manor UCC, Virginia Beach, Va. Pembroke Manor had been a project of the organization for several years. It is anticipated that the Eastern Virginia Christian Missionary Association will continue in relationship to the new Eastern Virginia Association. It will serve the same function in Eastern Virginia as the Church Builders Club in North Carolina.

The 1970 Appeal of the Church Builders Club is now in progress. At the time this report was prepared a total of \$1,500 had been contributed. Each of you has received an envelope in which your contribution to the Church Builders Club can be mailed. The major project this year is the Pilgrim UCC, Charlotte, N. C.

As has been the case for several years, funds administered by the Mission Board of the former Southern Convention have been made available to aided fields in cooperation with the Church Extension Committee.

The Church Extension Committee is mindful of the important responsibilities assigned to it and will continue to seek to serve faithfully and effectively.

### EXHIBIT (O)

#### A RESOLUTION CONCERNING THE POPULATION EXPLOSION, THERAPEUTIC ABORTION AND FAMILY-LIFE EDUCATION

The evidence is now clear that man's numbers and his consumption are overwhelming the thin, life-giving film of earth, water and air that encircles his planet. The unlimited capacity to reproduce is pressing against the limited capacity of the earth to sustain life.

Before the world reaches a point where the quality of life progressively deteriorates, imaginative and vigorous action on a grand scale is needed to avoid this danger and to create a wholesome environment in which personal dignity can come to make the life of human beings.

At all levels of national and international life, but most necessary in the local villages and cities of our states, programs and policies are needed which

will encourage family planning and the wise use of our resources. Our citizens must come to understand that matters once considered as issues of personal or public morality are now issues of public or personal survival as well.

We commend the efforts of such groups as Planned Parenthood-World Population and the Carolina Population Center at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill for their work in bringing such problems to the attention of the churches and the general public. We encourage them in their efforts to share information and to recommend solutions, and we encourage the churches to avail themselves of the resources of such groups for education and program planning in local communities.

As a part of our concern for human life, we believe that churchmen should encourage programs of family life and sex education for members of the churches and in the wider community. Such education, when done wisely and with sensitivity, can assist in providing not only knowledge but a sense of worth and appreciation for all of life.

Unwanted pregnancies, even pregnancies which are welcomed but still inappropriate, cause problems not only for the respective families but for society at large. Fortunately many states are now recognizing that such pregnancies threaten not only the physical life of the mother but her and the family's emotional and socio-economic health as well. While therapeutic abortion is still not available to many persons in our states, even to those who qualify under the newer state laws, because of cost factors, we support the efforts of such groups as the North and South Carolina Medical Associations which have called for further liberalization of existing state laws so that all women, for whatever reason, can have abortions performed under safe, healthful conditions by qualified practitioners of medicine. We commend the study of the theological and ethical implications of abortion to the churches, and we encourage churchmen, clergymen, physicians and hospital administrators to counsel and enable those women seeking to end problem pregnancies by abortion under the law to do so without embarrassment, excessive cost, or unwarranted delay.

## **EXHIBIT (P)**

### **STATEMENT**

#### **THE FAMILY ASSISTANCE PLAN**

We agree with President Nixon's statement of last August: "The present welfare system has failed us . . . I propose a new approach that will make it more attractive to go to work than to go on welfare and will establish a nationwide minimum payment to dependent families with children. I propose that the Federal Government pay a basic income to those American families who cannot care for themselves in whichever state they live."

In 1968 the number of relief recipients increased 9.5% and the cost increased 25%. Both figures will continue to rise as more marginal and untrained persons become economically useless in a technological society and as expectations of a good life continue to rise. The cost notwithstanding, the results of the welfare system are unsatisfactory to nearly everyone. The great

variations in welfare allowances have caused a migration from the south to the north and from the country to the city, with even more frustrations resulting. The taxpayer protests the cost and the lack of achievement. The welfare client protests low standards and the general debilitating effect on his character, ambition and stamina.

We believe the President moved bravely and in the right direction when he recommended a floor under family income. His proposal moves from a haphazard plan of charity to a comparatively simple procedure by which our rich society makes a share of its products available to all its citizens. He has recognized the needs of our disabled neighbors for help, the needs of our families to stay together, and the needs of our unskilled and unmotivated for training and hope that will enable them to become proud and useful citizens.

We approve of the President's proposal to tie the income maintenance program to programs for job training, job placement and employment. This includes approval for allowing earnings of \$720 without any reduction in the family allowance and for further earnings to be deducted at only 50%. We approve the principle that suitable employment be made available for able-bodied adults.

In expressing our support for the Family Assistance Plan, we are aware of dangers in the proposals and of additional programs needed as supplements.

We believe, for example, that the plan should cover single persons and childless couples. There is no reason for them not to share in the same opportunities as parents.

We are opposed to the requirement that mothers with school aged children and without a male in the home must seek training and employment for themselves. There may be instances where it is better for such a mother to be at home.

The need for child care centers has not yet been stated adequately, for either infant or school age children. It is of great importance that there be an ample number of such centers and that they be well equipped and well staffed with counsellor-teachers. This is essential to break the cycle of poverty. Mere custody is insufficient.

The level of federal income maintenance is also open to question. Should it be the \$1600 for a family of four, or \$2400, or the poverty level of \$3600, or the proposal of the White House Conference for \$5500? It should be emphasized that the levels proposed are for only the federal share. It is widely agreed that the federal government should take an increasing role in the welfare-workfare picture, in standards, administration and financing. In the meantime, with low federal payments, there must be a better guarantee that the states will maintain their payments than is now in the proposed legislation.

And finally the programs for training and full employment must be more successful than any the nation has had to-date and the federal government must finally assume the role of the employer, the guarantor that if all else fails, it will provide a job for every job seeker.

**EXHIBIT (Q)**  
**AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION**  
**OF THE UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST**

The Seventh General Synod adopted two amendments to the Constitution which require affirmative action by at least two-thirds of the Conferences before they can be finally adopted and declared in force:

69-GS-22 VOTED: That Paragraph 55 of the Constitution be deleted and the following substituted for it:

55. To determine by appropriate By-Laws the composition of an Executive Council to act for the General Synod ad interim, and to nominate and elect at least a majority of its members.

69-GS-23 VOTED: That Paragraph 6 of the Constitution be amended by deleting the word "Treasurer" and substituting for it the words "Director of Finance and Treasurer."

## ANNUAL MEETING

### CHURCHMEN'S FELLOWSHIP of the SOUTHERN CONFERENCE

June 9, 1970

Steve Hornok reported for the former Southern Convention group in Eastern Virginia which has been involved in a wide range of activities. Funds have been collected for flood relief. Eye glasses have been collected and sent overseas. The group has participated in Heifer Projects.
