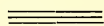

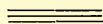

Southern Christian Convention

HELD AT RALEIGH, N. C., APRIL 27-30, 1920

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

At the suggestion of Chairman C. H. Rowland, of the Foreign Mission Board and Chairman W. A. Harper on Nominations, through J. O. Atkinson, Secretary of the Mission Board, on June 20, 1918, J. A. Williams, of Franklin, Virginia, was chosen to serve on Foreign Mission Board, in place of J. J. Pitt, who was in Y. M. C. A. work in France.

The matter of religious war-work among soldiers and sailors, which was referred to us, with power to act, found solution in the suggestion of the government to abandon denominational service in camps and leave the work to chaplains and religious camp workers, and the close of the war on November 11, 1918. Nothing was done by your Committee, no expense was incurred, and the question closed with peace. We are to be congratulated that we had taken no steps to inaugurate such service.

We supplied vacancies in the Southern delegation to the American Christian Convention.

Moved by a spiritual and spontaneous demand for an opportunity for every member of the Church to do work for the Master, and expressed by the voice of J. E. West, in the Christian Missionary Association, in Portsmouth, Virginia, December 9, 1919, and voiced again in a Mission Board meeting, with others present, in Suffolk, Virginia, December 12, 1919, your Board, at the request of the Suffolk meeting, called a meeting of all Executive Committees of the Conference composing the Convention to meet in Suffolk, Virginia, at the expense of the Mission Board, on December 30, 1919. At this joint Executive meeting it was decided to launch a Forward Movement of the Convention, with a final financial five-year goal for \$2,000,000.00; and a Campaign Committee was chosen to direct the work. A working Committee was finally chosen, and they worked out all the details of the campaign. Splendid literature and efficient speakers have rendered it unnecessary for us to recite the plans here, as a report from the Campaign Committee will make plain the plans and work of the Men and Millions Forward Movement.

The Editor received 25 per cent. of the gross receipts of The Christian Sun as his salary, \$1,768.70 for 23 months, an average of \$76.90 per month. The deficit on the actual cost of The Sun was \$869.08; add to that the sum received by the Editor for his services, \$1,768.70, and the total deficit for 23 months is \$2,637.78, an average of \$144.68 per month. In addition to the Convention Fund from which this deficit has been paid, the Committee has borrowed \$500.00 from the Mission Board to maintain the regular issue of the paper. It is evident that some remedy must be found to correct this situation, and provision must be made to meet the increased cost of publication.

By the kind invitation of the Raleigh church, this Convention is now the guest of this congregation.

The program has been prepared with some care, and is presented for your approval and use, with the hope that it is elastic enough to enable the Convention to do its work without restraint at any stage of its deliberations.

REPORT OF REVISION COMMITTEE

Your Committee held a meeting of nine sessions at Elon College, N. C., August 12, 13, 14, 15, 1918, with all the members present, and Drs. J. W. Wellons, J. U. Newman and W. P. Lawrence, sitting with us by invitation.

The result of that meeting has been published in The Christian Sun, with request for criticism, and none has come to the Committee.

The principal changes include the elimination of chapter IV to end of Part I; all of Part III; and the suggestion that Scripture reference **only** be printed in the margins.

Nothing was passed without the unanimous vote of the Committee and the approval of others present.

There has been no real demand for the publication of a new edition of Principles and Government, during the biennium, and hence we have waited for the action of the Convention upon what we have done. If you approve what we have reported, we suggest that the Committee be continued that they may review their work, thoroughly, before publication.

We will not ask your time to hear the book, as revised, read, unless you request it.

We favor text-books on the nature and effects of alcohol for our public schools.

We view with deep concern the increase of juvenile parentage and the growing disregard of the marriage vow.

We favor doing all we can to discourage such things.

REPORT OF THE MEN AND MILLIONS FORWARD MOVEMENT

The Men and Millions Forward Movement has just begun. From all over the Church comes the insistent plea that it be continued in some form and that this session of the Convention provide for this very thing. To those whose vision and suffrage brought the Movement into existence and to those who have labored as best they could on its behalf this plea is a most satisfying evidence of our Father's leadership in it all.

History

The history of the Movement is set forth in the literature that has been widely circulated, but since this report will become a permanent record a brief statement of its origin will be in order.

On December 9, 1919, Col. J. E. West was speaking before the Christian Missionary Association of the Eastern Virginia Conference in session at Portsmouth, Va. Under inspiration he declared it his conviction that the hour had arrived for every member of the Christian Church to be given an opportunity to contribute to the general enterprises of the Church through an every-member canvass and for an effort to be made to interest all in the Kingdom's work.

On December 12 an unofficial group of our workers at the suggestion of the Mission Board gathered in Suffolk, Va., to consider the matter. This group memorialized the Conference and Convention Executive Committees to launch such a Movement.

On December 30, the Conference Executive Committees of the Conferences met in Suffolk and recommended to the Convention Executive Committee that such a Movement be undertaken. That very day the Convention Executive Committee approved and the Movement that has stirred our people as they have never been moved before began.

On January 12, 1920, in Raleigh, the Movement was finally organized and the actual work undertaken. In the days since what has transpired is comparable to a spiritual revolution in the Church. Democracy in religion matched democracy in nation, in a genuine popular uprising to make the world safe for the cause of Christ through a co-operative effort to propagate that cause.

It has been made plain to every one, however, that the Convention itself could revise this tentative schedule in any manner it might elect.

The Movement Objectives

The objectives of the Movement were set as follows:

1. One per cent. of our total membership in some line of definite Christian service as a life-work, such as the ministry, or in preparation for it.
2. Ten per cent. of our total membership enrolled as tithers.
3. A ten per cent. increase in our membership this year.
4. One hundred per cent. of our membership subscribing to the Men and Millions Forward Movement.

How It Was To Be Done

Team-work was from the very beginning known to be the only hope of the Movement's success. This principle was applied first of all to the field officers, whose duties were defined as follows:

(a) Field Officers.

Dr. J. O. Atkinson, as Chairman, presides at the regular Thursday morning counsel-meetings of the Committee, and as Field Secretary keeps in touch with all the departments, aids in the execution of their plans, delivers the message of the Movement in strategic places, is to put on preliminary canvasses in a few churches in advance of the general canvass, will work especially for Life-Recruits, and is the general field man of the Movement.

Rev. C. B. Riddle, as Secretary, keeps the records of the regular Thursday morning counsel-meetings of the Committee, as Secretary of the Speakers' Bureau, is responsible for the delivery of the message of the Movement by the spoken word to all Conventions and to every church, and as Secretary of Advertising gives out all press notices and does all the advertising of the Movement through newspapers and posters.

Dr. W. A. Harper, as Secretary of Organization and Publicity, is responsible for the plan of organization, for the appointment of and training of the workers, and for the production of the literature of the campaign.

Superintendent Charles D. Johnston, as Executive Secretary, is auditor of accounts during the campaign and collector of the funds after they are raised.

Mr. C. D. West is the permanent treasurer of the Movement.

(b) Organization Officers.

An organization was then provided for each Conference, for each of thirty-five regional districts, and for each local church. In all these units recognition was carefully provided for ministers, laymen and lay-women.

(c) Training Conferences.

These organization officers were trained in a group of our pastors, a rally for each Conference, and a rally for each district. The district leaders were to carry the educational feature directly to the local church. In addition a final training Conference was held on plans for the final drive attended by the district leaders. Considering the health and weather conditions prevalent, each of these gatherings was a signal expression of the people's interest.

(d) The Spoken Word.

The Secretary of the Speakers' Bureau by a Flying Squadron had a message of inspiration delivered in every church.

The Four Minute Speakers did splendid work in the local churches.

(e) Literature.

In addition to the literature mailed out, we have on the average sent out 1,500 personal letters each week giving directions for the conduct of the various drives and stimulating zeal for and interest in the cause.

Cost of Campaign

The Executive Secretary reports that the Campaign has so far cost \$12,801.11.

What Has Been Accomplished

All reports are not in yet. The local leaders have been so desirous of getting beyond their quotas in all the objectives that they have withheld sending in what they have done in some instances. They will report later and the results will be published in The Christian Sun and in pamphlet form for distribution. We give here what has been reported, though all financial credits will have to be compared with the cards to be sent to the Executive Secretary before we can be sure of their accuracy:

This leaves \$275,827.75 to be raised to complete the \$2,000,000.00 goal. Some of this we know has been provided, but it has not been reported.

Completing the Work

We recommend that the Field Officers with the Organization Forces and such assistants as they shall need carry on the work of the Movement till every church is reached and that this work be completed by July 1, 1920. Let us call the months in between, Consecrated Months.

Further Recommendations

We recommend further:

That the Men and Millions Movement Organization be kept intact, as far as possible, until the next session of the Convention, and that a continued effort be made to conserve the work undertaken during the campaign, and that the organization be encouraged to develop the spiritual interests of the Church and Kingdom during the next biennium.

Advantages of Perpetuating the Movement

The advantages of perpetuating this Movement are many. In the first place, it will be an injury to any local church that has been unable through its own leaders to function in this Movement to be let alone in its defeat. We can render no finer service in genuine Christian Brotherhood than to give to these brethren of ours the stimulus of a great undertaking well done.

When the present objectives have all been realized, the Movement through its organization, can turn its attention to such other items of progressive church work as increasing the circulation of *The Christian Sun*, inducing all members to unite with the church where they live, following up the Life-Work Recruits, formulating plans for utilizing the Four Minute Speakers as a constant force in the local church, and in many other ways.

Finally

In conclusion, we would express profound gratitude to our Heavenly Father that He ever put it into the hearts of our leaders to launch this Movement. We wish to thank our leaders for entrusting to us, in our weakness, the conduct of this matchless cause. And we wish further to record our deep appreciation for the fine spirit of co-operation and sympathy which has greeted us in our plans on every hand, not only from our ministers but also from our laymen and lay-women. We cannot individualize here, but God knows the devotion and sacrifice that have made possible the success we have as a people achieved and in that Book that never knows an error in its records each faithful heart has received that credit for duty well done which shall never cease to gladden and rejoice throughout eternity.

REPORT OF MISSION BOARD

Your Board feels gratified at the increased interest in the missionary work at home and abroad. We feel that our people are realizing that creeds must be translated into deeds if we are to be effectual in Kingdom service. On this account, we have endeavored to keep before the people by letters and the printed page both the opportunity for service and a great objective. A special campaign for individual gifts for missions was conducted from September 1, 1917, until December 30, 1918, resulting in cash and subscriptions to be paid within a period of five years to something over \$125,000.00. In securing these subscriptions a missionary propaganda was carried on which informed many of our people both of the field in which we were trying to work and the great opportunities for services in that field. Through their gifts hundreds became interested who were indifferent before. People will follow their gifts with their interest, "for where your treasure is, there will your heart be also."

Moreover our women have been very active in organizing societies in the study of missions and in preparing to send out and support missionaries. Very many of our Sunday schools have also missionary study of one kind or another and are beginning to take offerings once a month and sometimes more often for missions. Our Burlington, North Carolina, Sunday school is now supporting a missionary at a cost of sixty dollars per month and we are advised find joy in the same. Catawba Springs, one of our churches of Wake County in the North Carolina Conference, with commendable missionary spirit and zeal, is accumulating a fund with which to build a church in some foreign field to be designated by the Board. These are evidences, in fact, on every hand that the missionary spirit is being awakened and developed among individuals, churches, Sunday schools, Christian Endeavor Societies, and other units of Christian service.

Since January 1, the Board has been much interested in our Men and Millions Forward Movement, many of its members devoting much of their time and giving liberally of their means and using their Field Secretary continuously to help carry forward this Movement. We feel that the Movement has wonderfully accelerated the missionary spirit which will be far more telling in the future than will the amount of money accruing to our treasury from this source. When the church membership can be induced to contribute liberally to all the interests and benevolences of the church, no one interest or benevolence need fear as to consequences for itself. The Men and Millions Movement has helped to awaken our people and to interest many who were not formerly interested in Kingdom work. Your Board is most happy in having had a part and lend itself to the accomplishment of this great task. We feel somehow that the work so well begun must be carried on until the Movement reaches every church in all the Conferences of the Convention.

In keeping with the order of the Convention two years ago, we began on January 1, 1920 the Department of Evangelism, with Dr. C. H. Rowland and Mr. J. A. Williams, Franklin, Va., as Committee on Evangelism, and Rev. A. Victor Lightbourne,

the evangelist. Thus far the reports have been most gratifying indicating that the brethren and churches are responding most gladly to the efforts in this behalf. The Committee has worked faithfully in making dates and giving general direction to the work and Brother Lightbourne is proving himself a most efficient, satisfactory and successful evangelist. Your Board very much hopes that this Department may not only be continued but may be developed to the point where we shall not only require one but many evangelists in the field. We are very sensitive of the need of evangelism both to encourage and to supplement the busy pastorate. We feel too, that this department will not only increase the total of church members but if conducted as planned will result in increasing the total of churches and congregations as well.

We submit the following recommendations:

(1) That the work of our Men and Millions Forward Movement be continued until the work has been given a full trial in every church.

(2) That in order to reach our young people with the missionary message not only will we have to form Young Peoples' Missionary Societies, but teach missions in the Sunday school. We urge, therefore, that every effort be made to get missions taught by some approved method to suit the local situation in every Sunday school of the churches of the Convention.

(3) That inasmuch as our Women's Missionary Societies have proven such blessings to the churches in which they have been organized, that we urge all our pastors to seek the co-operation of the Woman's Board and the Mission Secretary to organize a Woman's and a Young People's Society in each church.

(4) The Board feels that we should begin a mission work in China, and that it would very much stimulate our people as well as edify them to undertake such work as early as practicable. On this account, we purpose asking the A. C. C. that their Board prosecute the work in Japan, which work has been so admirably carried on, and that our Board for the sake of bringing home the idea of initiative and responsibility, seek out the most suitable place in China to start the work and adopt such plans and methods as the Board may deem wise in prosecuting such a work. The Board, furthermore, feels willing to assume responsibility if deemed wise of financing entirely our work in Porto Rico. Of course, the detail of such work and such purpose would have to be worked out by the Board and in agreement with the A. C. C. Board. We bring the matter to the attention of the Convention that there may be an expression of opinion on the part of the delegates as touching this important and weighty matter.

(5) We urge our people to stand by the work and give every encouragement possible to the work which we have begun in recent months at Washington, D. C., and at Richmond, Va., and Lumber City, Ga. The Board is assisting the work this year for full time preaching at Chapel Hill, North Carolina, in paying off the indebtedness, which is now finished, at Reidsville, N. C., and Winchester, Va., in helping with the building fund at Franklinton, N. C., and on the pastor's salary at Ports-

mouth, Va., South Norfolk, Va., Rose Hill, Columbus, Ga., and on the indebtedness at Lambert's Point, Va., which is now finished, and Vanceville, Ga., now finished. In the foreign field, the Board is assisting in the work both in Porto Rico and in Japan, the former in the matter of salary of Miss Williams and repairs to damaged property and in the latter for the building of a missionary home.

(6) The Board at its last meeting decided to begin work in the mountains of Virginia, and Miss Iola Hedgepeth, of Barrett's church, Virginia, who has had experience in mountain work is to take up the work this summer and is to be assisted by volunteers. We recommend that publicity be given to this work and that our people interest themselves in the outlying mountain districts of Virginia and North Carolina, preparatory to an extensive missionary propaganda in behalf of these people who need our help.

(7) We heartily commend The Christian Missionary published at Dayton, Ohio, to our Missionary Societies and to individuals as a magazine worthy of our heartiest support and a careful reading.

(8) We recommend that the Board of Trustees of Elon College be requested to establish a theological department with at least two full-time professors beginning with the next term.

(9) We recommend the establishment of a ministers' training conference to meet annually at Elon College, full plans and details to be worked out by this Board in connection with the Trustees of Elon College.

Financial

(10) We recommend that \$1,200 should be a minimum salary for single ministers and \$1,500 for married ministers.

Our last report from the proceedings of the Board for the fiscal year of 1916 show that we had received a total of \$1,724.00.

From July 18, 1917 to September 7, 1917, there came into our hands from the Woman's Home and Foreign Mission Board \$65.00.

The last report showed the work of the office financially through March 1918, a total collected of \$7,616.15. Continuing as per reports made and properly audited, we have received through our Executive Secretary and turned over to the Treasurer of the Convention, the following amounts by months:

The Treasurer's Account as rendered shows amounts coming into our hands through the regular channels of the Woman's Board and from the annual Conferences for Foreign Missions. During the biennium (1918-1920) we have been assisting the churches at Franklinton, N. C., Reidsville, N. C., Winchester, Va., Chapel Hill, N. C., Portsmouth, Va., Lambert's Point, Va., South Norfolk, Va., Rosemont, Va., Rose Hill, Columbus, Ga., Raleigh N. C., Henderson, N. C., Vanceville and Lumber City, Ga., also the foreign work through the A. C. C. in Porto Rico and Japan.

Loan Fund

Our last report showed cash on hand in Elon Bank and Trust Company \$492.20. Also as additional assets two notes secured by mortgages amounting to \$1,000.00. The account since that date has not been altered except by a payment on note held against Chapel Hill church of \$256.00, which gives a total of cash on hand of \$748.20, and securities of \$744.00. Since the repeal of the orders by Conferences to pay 10 per cent. of their home mission funds into the Loan Fund there is no source of income to this fund. We recommend that the Mission Board at its next annual session either turn this Loan Fund into the current fund or take steps to increase the same as the Board may deem wise.

Our Board has adopted the plan of meeting in annual session on or about September 15 of each year at which time all accounts are rendered, and reports made and properly audited and examined and so far as possible plans of work and appropriations are made for the coming year. In cases of emergency the Board acts from time to time through its Executive Committee, and in this way the Board is enabled to respond to urgent needs and meet pressing demands. Our work together the past biennium has been congenial and agreeable and the spirit of harmony and unanimity of decision has prevailed throughout.

During the two years past we have been able to finish paying off all indebtedness held against the Institution and have been able to meet all expenses incurred.

We bought a tract of land containing 30 acres and paid \$1,050.00 for it. We have also been permitted to purchase the Dawson tract of land which contained 32 acres. This tract cost us \$5,200. The purchase of this tract was made possible by a man who is not a member of our Church, but who is very much interested in our work.

Our building has been re-painted on the outside and most of it on the inside. Sleeping porches have been finished for the boys and this addition gives us more sleeping space for children and has enabled us to take more children. We have also purchased farm machinery and added several good cows to our dairy and we are now making milk and butter enough to supply our Institution.

The churches, Sunday schools and friends of the little orphan children have been very loyal to us during the past two years and have made the success of the Institution possible.

We have taken care of practically sixty children all the time since our last report to this Convention. We now have sixty in the Institution. While this is true, we have also had to turn from our doors more than sixty since November because we had no room.

This condition should not be and our Church ought to provide room and give these worthy children a home and a chance in life.

Besides the income in money to the Institution, many have given clothing, bedding, shoes, etc. The cotton mills in Alabama and other counties have been good to us, and last Thanksgiving contributed about seventeen hundred yards of gingham, dress goods, blue denims, etc.

The guano firms have also come to our aid and last year contributed seventy-five bags of fertilizer to help us in the work. Holland and Beamon Company, of Suffolk, Va., make us a present of a car of coal each fall to run our heating plant. These gifts last year amounted to more than three thousand dollars.

Two years ago a terrific hail storm struck our farm and destroyed all our growing crop, and it was then too late to plant more except feed. But Mr. J. M. Darden appealed to thirteen churches in Eastern Virginia Conference and shipped us a car load of food contributed by the good people of the churches. Many other churches sent can goods, etc.

The "Flu" did not pass us by but out of fifty children at the time of its first visit, a little more than a year ago, forty-nine had it. We also had four cases of pneumonia and one death.

One of our great needs at the present is a building for the smaller children and some arrangements ought to be made by which we could build this building and give forty more children a home.

We are profoundly grateful to the Brotherhood for the tion out of debt with cash in the bank to our credit in the general fund amounting to \$8,200.95 and cash in the Children's Home Fund to the amount of \$5,362.06, making a grand total of \$13,563.01.

We are profoundly grateful to the brotherhood for the loyal support we have received in this work.

We think this report shows that a great work has been done for this Institution, and the only honor or credit that your Board of Trustees claims is that when we secure Brother Chas. D. Johnston as Superintendent we got the right man in the right place. All the success and praise is due to our Superintendent, Mr. Johnston, who has worked so hard and willingly to make your institution what it is today.

We know that Brother Johnston has not had an easy job and he has had his troubles as well as the troubles of the Orphanage. You will remember during the two years Brother Johnston had one of the heaviest losses any man can sustain—I refer to the loss of his dear wife. I know from a financial standpoint that he is losing money every year.

Brother Johnston loves the work and is making a wonderful success and we pray that this Convention will back him up in every way possible, which we are sure you will do.

REPORT OF THE EDITOR AND PUBLISHING AGENT TO THE BOARD OF PUBLICATION

The usual work has been done during the biennium by the Editor and Publishing Agent. The proceedings of this Convention were issued in booklet form immediately after its Franklin, Va., session and the same included in the 1919 Christian

Annual. The 1920 Annual has also been issued during the biennium at a cost of \$915.62, which was \$433.37 more than the income. This means that the Convention will have to sustain a deficit on the Annual or increase the price to 50 cents per copy. I had difficulty in finding any printer to accept the last volume of the Annual due to labor conditions, but I was fortunate in being able to secure the publisher who made the minimum estimate on it.

The Christian Sun has been published each week during the biennium. The income on The Sun from May 1, 1918 to April 1, 1920 amounted to \$7,990.37. The cost of maintaining the paper, including the Editor's salary, was \$9,784.24, which left a deficit of \$2,571.87. This deficit has been made from the Convention Treasury, in accordance with the action of the last Convention. It is safe to say that the deficit during the coming biennium will be much more, and this report has been made to the Board of Publication for such recommendations as it will present later.

The action of this body two years ago set the Editor's salary at 25 per cent. of the gross income of The Sun and 25 per cent. of the net income of the Publishing Agent account. The Editor has received as a commission from The Sun \$1,793.87, and \$313.09 from the Publishing Agent account, which makes a total salary of \$2,106.96, or an average of \$88.35 per month. During this period I spent \$598.00 for office help and office rent, which reduced the salary of the Editor and Publishing Agent to an average of \$67.75 per month. To January 1, of this year, I had office help employed only a part of the time, but found it necessary to have all-time help, due to increased demands of the paper and the church upon my time. I now have an office girl in my employment at a salary of \$20.00 per week, and meeting the expense myself. I call upon the Board of Publication and the Convention to provide for this item of expense, which I cannot meet personally, and which I must have in order to efficiently serve the Church.

A separate account was opened on May 1, 1918 to be known as the Publishing Agent Account. This account was started with a capital stock of zero and immediately purchased supplies on the strength of this readily subscribed capital stock. The report on this account is as follows:

With no capital stock with which to begin I have been at a disadvantage during the term in order to keep bills paid and at the same time keep an adequate stock on hand. I would be glad for the Convention to make provisions to relieve the Publishing Agent Account of the deficit on the 1920 Christian Annual and thus put the business in better condition.

The supply of Government and Principles has practically exhausted and orders being received indicate that the revised edition should go to press at the earliest possible date.

Two years ago I was instructed to have all the volumes of The Christian Sun bound at the expense of the Convention. I found so many volumes incomplete that I have been working endeavoring to find the missing copies and have a large majority of the volumes now ready and will be shipped to the bindery within the next few weeks. I regret the delay but could not, under the circumstances, push the work any faster.

I am without an adequate office for The Christian Sun and the display of books, Bibles and church supplies. I see and feel the need every day of a permanent home for The Christian Sun, and it is my earnest hope that the Board of Publication and the Convention take some necessary steps at this time looking forward to such an enterprise. I also feel that The Sun should own its own publishing plant and, though we did not succeed in such an enterprise a few years ago, I am of the opinion that the efforts should be continued and the Convention look forward to The Sun owning its plant in some progressive town where business will justify its existence.

The present subscription price of The Sun will not by far meet the deficit and it is for your consideration as to whether the subscription price be changed or not. The outlook as to the cost of publishing the paper is not hopeful. Book paper and also newsprint is exceedingly scarce and the printers are unable to purchase any satisfactory quantities at any price while the mills advise that the supply has been sold from six to twelve months ahead.

I am deeply indebted to the friends throughout the Convention for their loyal and unstinted support, during the biennium. Uncertain conditions have caused the work to have more

or less worry about it but I have sought at all times to do the best I could and leave it with the Board of Publication and the Convention to accept, modify or reject this report.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PUBLICATION.

Your Board to whom was committed the matter of our publication interests have surveyed the field, and after due consideration, we submit the following facts and suggestions:

As a people we have been slow to seize our opportunity in the use of the printed page in the propagation of the gospel. The use of the printing press as a means of disseminating truth and the propagation of ideas is more widespread today than ever. As a proof of this fact we find such literature sown throughout the land. No matter how high or how low the mission of any body of people, they use liberally the printed pages. It may be used to wise and good ends, or to bad and unholy purposes. We are sorry to believe that the latter class more lavishly use the printing press than the former.

We urge a more liberal use of the printing press than even before in our history, as a means of giving the ends we seek.

1. We need to give our Church paper, The Christian Sun, every possible advantage in reaching the people. It must have a better support, or it will become less effective. To gain such ends, let us not wait the passing of another biennium—let us begin now, for all the while the publication of a Church paper is becoming more difficult. Even now white paper on which to print our paper is almost beyond the purchasing power of money.

2. We urge more investment in the publication and distribution of pamphlets, books and tracts. The printed page is a great education for all classes.

3. We need to develop authorship among our own people. Properly and wisely done it will pay compound interest at a high rate. A book written by one of our people will have a far wider circulation than would a similar book written by an outsider. Then it must be acknowledged that our people much need the help of such literature.

There is now a volume of rare merit written by one of our ablest men, ready for the printers, and yet we are allowing our people to famish intellectually and spiritually for the lack of such a work. And at the same time we are discouraging its gifted and cultured author from attempting to use his ability as a writer for the good of our people.

To give such a situation the right to exist among us is to tie our own hands for larger usefulness in the Lord's vineyard. It also shows how we fail to develop and bring to their best friends fruitage the men and women God has given us. We plead for reform and a larger effort in this direction.

We are losing money now on our periodical literature. This is shown in both The Christian Sun and the Christian Annual. In view of this fact we recommend:

1. That the price of The Christian Annual be made 50 cents instead of 25 cents, heretofore. This seems a necessity since the last issue involved a loss of almost \$500.

2. We recommend that we make an effort to provide The Christian Sun with an adequate office for the work of the editor and for the display of books, Bibles and church supplies. We also recommend that the new Board of Publication be constituted a committee for such an undertaking.

3. We recommend this Convention to consider at this time the wisdom of establishing in connection with our publishing house a book store to be known as the Book Depository, and that the Board of Publication be authorized to borrow \$1,000 for the establishment of the Book Store, as one means of extending the circulation of good literature among our people.

4. We recommend that our Editor and Publishing Agent be allowed office help, the cost not to exceed \$1,000.00 per year.

5. By request of the Editor we recommend that hereafter the custom of appointing the Editor Chairman of the Board of Publication be discontinued, since it is hardly the fair thing to ask him to report on the merits and demerits of his own work for the Church.

9. We recommend that the fiscal year for The Christian publication be the Auditor of the accounts of the Editor and Publishing Agent and that monthly reports be submitted for such auditing.

7. In order that Board Meetings may be held without incurring serious expense we recommend that the nominating committee be requested to group the members of the Board near a common center, thus enabling the said Board to give proper attention to business requiring the attention of the Board without delay or large expense.

8. We recommend that the convention fix the Editor's salary. We also recommend that the present commission basis for his salary be discontinued.

9. We recommend that the fiscal year of The Christian Sun and the Publishing Agent begin with April 1 each year hereafter.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

We wish again to affirm our conviction as the necessity of Christian Education in a democracy. We would go further and declare our conviction that it is equally essential for the world. Some where in the social order there must be an institution functioning in the production of leaders, endowing them in their formative days with the spirit of unselfish altruistic service. We do not hesitate to say that that institution judged by experience and purposeful aim is the Christian College. Had the nations of the world been wise to spend millions through their generous citizens for Christian Education, the billions that went up in smoke and shell and hate during the World War need never to have been spent. But we must cease lamenting the past and adjust ourselves to the present challenge to reconstruct the world on the basis of Christian leadership, for which we are dependent upon the Christian College.

Elon College

The pride of this Convention's heart educationally is our own Elon College now fast approaching her thirtieth anniversary commencement. This institution conceived in love and hope, brought forth in poverty and devotion, baptized with the high purpose to provide men and women with the privileges of higher education under positive Christian influences, has through these thirty years justified our every hope and rewarded our every sac-

rice. With the pride of humility and gratitude for service rendered we point to Elon as the largest single contribution our Brotherhood has made in constructive statesmanship to the Kingdom of God.

In 1889, the year Elon was chartered, we had seventy-two ministers, two of whom were college graduates. We now have 100 ministers and 61 of them are college graduates. In 1889 we had 17 licentiates, none of whom were college men. Now we have 22 licentiates and one-half of them are college men.

The distribution of the 368 full graduates is indication, too, as to the faithfulness with which our college has lived up to her high profession of Christian service.

The Standardization Fund

The Franklin (1918) Session of the Convention authorized the Board of Trustees of Elon College to undertake the raising of additional endowment for Elon. The Trustees in their May session that year appointed a campaign committee consisting of Col. J. E. West, Hon. K. B. Johnson, and Dr. R. M. Morrow, with Dr. W. W. Staley as an ex-officio member representing the Convention as such, to start the campaign whenever they and the President should think proper. Accordingly the campaign was launched February 23, 1919 and concluded on June 30 of that year. The sum total subscribed was \$381,600.00. We herewith record our grateful appreciation for this generous response on the part of the church. We feel that the facts set forth above explain why our people gave so liberally.

We would too record our grateful appreciation of the wise committee that led in this campaign and of those who assisted

the President for varying portions of time in the field work outside their own local churches or fields of labor. These brethren were: Rev. A. T. Banks, Rev. R. F. Brown, Rev. E. M. Carter, Rev. L. I. Cox, Rev. H. S. Hardcastle, Rev. B. J. Howard, Prof. C. C. Johnson, Rev. J. Vincent Knight, Rev. G. O. Lankford, Rev. N. G. Newman, Rev. C. B. Riddle, Rev. W. W. Staley, Mr. L. W. Vaughan, Jr., Rev. T. E. White, and Rev. W. C. Wicker.

The Christian Church has every reason to be gratified at these results. We have done well, but we are far from reaching the requirements outlined by the Interchurch World Movement for a college to be able to do its best work. We herewith append their standards for a minimum college of 100 and for an efficient college of 500 students:

Our enrollment is fixed at four hundred, which, according to these standards, would require total assets of \$2,560,000, with a plant valued at \$788,000 and an endowment of \$1,772,000. Manifestly we have room to grow, according to these standardizers. We do not accept their conclusions, but merely give them as facts. It is our conviction that more things than buildings, equipment, and money are required to make a real college, and these Elon has in abundance, with her scholarly faculty of Christian men and women, her Christian atmosphere of altruism and brotherhood, her thirty years of proved service in the cause of humanity and of God. We resent any attempt on the part of standardizing agencies anywhere to reduce so vital an institution as a Christian College to a mere perfunctory sum in arithmetic. Issues of the Kingdom must not be dealt with in such Philistine fashion.

Elon's Needs

This, however, does not blind us to Elon's needs nor warrant us in any proposal to relax our efforts to strengthen our college. We enumerate the following needs as imperative: The prompt payment of all subscriptions that the endowment now largely unproductive may become productive, the elimination of the active liabilities account, a science hall, a fine arts building, a library and college activities building, and provision for the complete separation of the college and preparatory departments. We cannot provide for all of these now, but we can look forward to their coming and plan wisely therefor. It is also suggested that a law department might profitably be added.

Practice School for Elon

One of the essential needs for a Department of Education in a modern college is a practice school. It is becoming evident that the State Department of Education will not grant their best certificates to graduates of colleges not having had training in such schools. It would seem that Elon and our own Orphanage school, both children of our own church, might readily effect an arrangement that would prove mutually helpful.

Recent Developments at Elon

We call special attention to the establishment at Elon of the Department of Religious Education which we think will mean much for the future efficiency of our church work. We feel the same way in regard to the Summer School of Religious Education and Christian Methods, the first session of which is to be held, according to announcements, May 27 to June 11 of this year. We urge our people to avail themselves of this splendid opportunity.

We note, too, the wholesome development of the student life on the campus. We hope that Student Government, the students' paper, Maroon and Gold, and the Social Clubs designed as they are to meet the demands of Brotherhood and voluntary scholarly interests and devoid of all the objectionable features of the Greek letter fraternities in many places, will prove great blessings to Elon, as we believe they will.

The rating, too, of the honors that a student may hold, so as to prevent these valuable features of college life from accumulating too heavily upon any one student, commends itself to us as highly desirable.

We note with great satisfaction that the Alumni are moving to make the approaching commencement signal by bringing back large numbers of the graduates and former students in a tri-decade reunion. There are great possibilities for Elon in the loyalty and devotion of her Alumni.

The Men and Millions Forward Movement

This movement has been reported on elsewhere. We are glad the Board of Trustees agreed for Elon's president to give

what time was required to the prosecution of this cause. We rejoice in the success which has attended it and feel confident this Convention will in its wisdom be liberal in providing for Elon's needs out of the funds raised in this Movement.

Ministerial Education Fund

As at present administered, the funds of the various conferences for Ministerial Education are not yielding the results they might. There is a strong sentiment for pooling all these funds into one and having the money loaned by a central board upon the recommendation of the conference from which a young man or woman comes. It would seem an appropriate time now to begin this, since the Convention itself has a fund for this purpose as a result of the Men and Millions Forward Movement campaign.

Trustees for Elon College

We record with deep sorrow the death of two distinguished and devoted trustees of Elon College since our last session. Brothers W. J. Lee and D. S. Farmer. The Christian Church has rarely produced two such Christian men as these two laymen, representing the very best in Christian manhood.

It is, therefore, the duty of this session to nominate twenty trustees for Elon from which number ten will be chosen at the May session of the Board.

Institution for Georgia and Alabama

The Men and Millions Movement specifies under its call for Christian Education provision for an institution of higher learning for the Georgia and Alabama and the Alabama Conferences. There is no doubt that such an institution is needed there nor that it is deserved. The Burlington (1916) session provided a Board of Trustees for such an institution. Some of them have moved from that section now and a new board no doubt should be elected. The institution itself should be located, it seems to us, by a special committee and only after thorough investigation of places and with the co-operation of the State authorities. It is our conviction that an institution of Junior College grade is all we should attempt at this time.

Recommendations

We recommend:

I. That the Board of Trustees of Elon College be authorized to expend the money allotted to them from the Men and Millions Forward Movement in meeting the needs of the college for equipment as in their discretion seems wise and best.

II. That the college Trustees and the Orphanage Trustees be asked to join in providing a Practice School at Elon on terms that will be mutually helpful.

III. That the Alumni of the college be memorialized to undertake some definite objective for Elon which in their judgment shall be most needful at this time.

IV. That the ministerial education funds of the various conferences and of the Convention be pooled at Elon College, that the treasurer of the college be their custodian, and that this Board be empowered to order the loan of these funds upon the recommendation of the various conferences.

V. That the Convention Secretary be requested to write letters of sympathy to the families of Brothers W. J. Lee and D. S. Farmer, expressing at the same time the Convention's appreciation of the service of these brethren as Trustees of Elon College.

VI. That twenty Trustees for Elon College be nominated at this session.

VII. That this Convention in session elect twelve Trustees for the proposed institution to be located in Georgia or Alabama, who shall manage said institution after its charter has been secured and its location and scope determined.

VIII. That this Convention in session elect three persons to secure a charter for the proposed institution to be located in Georgia or Alabama, that they be empowered to select the site of its location, and directed to decide what grade of institution shall be established.

REPORT OF BOARD OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The Board of Religious Education was created by the Convention two years ago by the adoption of the following resolutions:

"That the Sunday School Board and the Christian Endeavor Board, appointed by the Convention, be incorporated under the laws of the State as a Board of Religious Education whose business it shall be to conduct the Young People's work of the Convention, with power to transact business, promote missionary

work among the young people, organize and support Sunday schools, Christian Endeavor Societies, collect money, publish literature, distribute periodicals and papers, and to undertake any other work that may be conducive to the growth and progress and religious education and training of the young people of the church."

In keeping with the above resolution the two Boards named have been incorporated under the laws of the State of North Carolina as the "Board of Religious Education of the Southern Christian Convention." The instruction not to involve the Convention, financially, has also been complied with. This new Board created by the Convention two years ago has been endeavoring to find its field of operation and to settle upon a means of support. This has been no easy task. The work to be done by the Board is great and difficult, but it cannot be done without men and money. We have had neither at our disposal. We have endeavored to work out a policy and program for the Department of Religious Education as follows:

I. PROGRAM OF FINANCE.

(A) Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Conventions.

We do not feel that any new apportionment should be made at this time, or that any special calls should be issued for funds. Yet we are aware that if the schools and Christian Endeavor Societies of the Convention are to go forward a fund must be provided with which to carry on and develop the work. In lieu then of a new apportionment on the schools and Societies, we recommend the following to be raised as Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Convention Fund, and that each local Convention, or the Convention of each Conference retain 20 per cent. of its Convention fund for current expenses, or as much thereof as is necessary, and that 80 per cent. of the remainder be sent to the Treasurer of the Board of Religious Education for the maintenance and development of the work on the following basis:

Which is approximately 10c per member for Sunday schools.

In the absence of statistics of C. E. Societies, they are also asked to send up 10c per member.

(B) Children's Day and Christian Endeavor Rally Day.

We recommend that Children's Day and Christian Endeavor Rally Day be observed annually and that the Board of Religious Education furnish programs free of charge to the schools and

societies of the various conventions, and that an offering be taken in cash and pledges for Sunday School and Christian Endeavor extension, and that said offerings be sent to the Treasurer of Board of Religious Education.

(C) Orphanage and Missions.

We recommend that the Sunday schools and Christian Endeavor Societies of all the Conferences observe one Sunday in each month as Orphanage Day and also one Sunday as Mission Day, and that on these days offerings be received for these respective causes.

II. PROGRAM OF SERVICE.

(1) The organization and maintenance of Sunday school and Christian Endeavor Societies in all the churches of the Convention and the planting of mission schools wherever opportunity affords.

(2) The training and development of Sunday school teachers, workers and Christian Endeavor leaders.

(3) Buildings and equipment adequate for Sunday school program of religious education designed to make the church a greater force for the moral and spiritual development of the community.

(4) The enlistment of the Christian home in the work of religious education—the co-operation of parents in the religious training of their children and in the establishment of a daily devotional period in the home.

(5) The holding of Sunday school and Christian Endeavor institutes and also week-day and vacation schools for religious training.

(6) The enlistment of life recruits for Christian work.

(7) Evangelism—the winning of the young to Christ and the church.

(8) Buildings and equipment adequate for Sunday school and Christian Endeavor work.

(9) The cultivation of the missionary spirit—missionary instruction—study classes.

III. FIELD SECRETARY.

We recommend the placing of a full time secretary in the field at the earliest date possible and that the matter of his selection, remuneration, duties, etc., be left to this Board for the present.

IV. SOME FACTS ABOUT OUR WORK.

The Board has endeavored to supply matter for a page in The Christian Sun devoted to Sunday school and Christian Endeavor work.

The Board prepared and distributed Children's Day programs to the Sunday schools of the Convention for 1919, free of charge, and requested all schools to use them and at the time of their exercises to take an offering for the work of the Board. Matter is now being prepared for the 1920 program.

We trust that all schools will use our program this year and send us a liberal offering for Sunday school and Christian Endeavor extension.

According to available reports there are 19,000 pupils enrolled in our Sunday schools. During the biennium they have contributed for all purposes about \$35,000. This is nearly three times as much as reported for the previous biennium. The enrollment is the same as reported two years ago. It is evident that our schools need boosting.

The Board reports with great pleasure that an increasing number of our schools are making monthly offerings for the Christian Orphanage and also a monthly offering for Missions. The Burlington school is supporting a missionary to Japan and finding it a joyful service. Catawba Springs of the North Carolina Conference is making monthly offerings to a fund with which that school purposes to build and equip a Catawba Springs church in a foreign field.

Twenty-five of our churches have Christian Endeavor Societies. A few churches have the three societies—Young Peoples', Intermediate and Junior. We desire to see active Christian Endeavor Societies in all of our churches. Christian Endeavor is the training department of the church.

6. That we pledge ourselves, under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, and imploring Divine help, to put forth our best and last efforts to double the membership of the Convention by the year 1924.

1. That the Convention appoint or elect a permanent board on super-annuation, said board to be composed of one member from each of the five Conferences of the Convention.

2. That the various Conferences composing this Convention turn their super-annuated funds into a common fund along with a similar fund raised in the Men and Millions Forward Movement to be known as Convention Super-annuated Fund.

3. That at the age of seventy or earlier in case of disability, to be determined in each case by the board, all ministers who have been actively engaged in the ministry for twenty years next preceding thereto shall receive annuities from this fund as follows:

(a) Single ministers, \$200 per year.

(b) Married ministers, \$300 per year.

(c) Widows, \$200 a year during their widowhood and membership in the Christian Church; dependents to be provided for in each case by the Board.

4. That the Committees on Super-annuation in the various Conferences be kept intact so as to recommend to the Board those worthy of help in the several Conferences and to assist in

every way possible in properly and justly administering this fund.

5. That the amounts herein named may be increased from time to time as funds are available and needs may demand.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM

There is no question more far-reaching than the matter of moral character. It touches the whole fabric of the social, industrial, and religious life. In this age when the commercial spirit is so predominant and the desire to get rich is so deep-seated, it is easy to forget the fundamental matter of character, and disregard the weightier matter of the eternal laws of God.

We recommend:

1. That we call our people to a more thorough reading and

study of the Bible, the great source of correct teaching in the field of moral and spiritual life.

2. That we deplore the general disregard of the sanctity of the Sabbath, and urge our people to make it a day of rest, and keep it holy unto the Lord.

3. That we urge a more general regard for the sanctity of the marriage relation, and urge our legislative and judicial authorities to discourage the growing practice of seeking a divorce in the courts of justice.

4. That we urge our people to be alert and active in securing a permanent victory for the temperance movement, and be diligent to secure the proper observance of the law.

5. That we urge a more active support of the officers of the law in trying to create and maintain a proper regard for legalized authority.

You cannot be devotional and not be missionary, neither can you be missionary unless there is devotion back of it somewhere. Our forces in this Conference are going to do a great deal more for missions and to save our foreign neighbor, when the call comes from within. The number is small who follow the impression of God's spirit when it comes to the subject of missions. Many listen to an outward call to duty, and smother the still small voice within that says: "Ye have robbed me of tithes and offerings." How lamentable this is! For, after all the real problem before us is not men, and not money, but HEART. "My son, give me thine heart." And the wise man knew that the life and money would then come. And so our real secret strength does not consist in sums of money, nor in numbers of men, but in its heart force. When the heart of the church pulsates with real love for her task, no burden will be too great, no task too difficult, and no goal too high.

"Over the mountains and over the waves,
Under the fountains and under the graves,
Under the floods that are deepest, which Neptune obey,
Over the rocks that are steepest, love will find the way."

We feel keenly our loss in the death of Rev. E. K. McCord, D. D., our Foreign Mission Secretary, who was present with us a year ago and delivered such splendid addresses.

We recommend:

1. That each church endeavor to organize a mission study class.
2. That more of our people read *The Christian Missionary*.
3. That the Sunday schools be asked to contribute monthly to missions, and thus teach the habit of systematic giving to missions.
4. That the plan of tithing be encouraged in our Sunday schools, Christian Endeavor Societies, Women's Home and Foreign Mission Societies, and all departments of our Church.
5. That we endeavor to raise \$300 for foreign missions through our apportionments next year as a minimum.

We rejoice at the large number of Life Recruits that have dedicated themselves to the service of God through the movement.

We commend Elon College to our people, as best adapted to their educational needs, and express our deep appreciation of the great service it has rendered our Church and the country at large.

We recommend:

1. That, in keeping with a resolution passed by the Southern Christian Convention, we pool our Ministerial Educational Funds into a general fund to be under the management of the Convention, with the understanding that ministerial students from our Conference are to receive aid from the fund upon our recommendation.
2. That any Superannuated Funds which may be raised by the Conference in the future be merged into the Southern Christian Convention Fund for that purpose.
3. That L. R. Townsend, W. M. Clem and J. T. Marshall be

admitted to the Biblical Class, and that they enter school immediately in preparation for the work.

It is through the Christian Endeavor mostly that we get our life work recruits. Dr. Mott says that 98 per cent of all life work recruits come from Young People's Societies.

Christian Endeavor is not for young people alone. A live society will make old young again, vigorous and active in Christian work, and give renewed strength to the church.

Only seven churches report Christian Endeavor Societies; viz., Timber Ridge, Winchester, Mayland, New Hope, Whistler's Chapel, Leaksville, Newport.

We recommend:

1. That pastors and leaders in churches where there are no Christian Endeavor Societies keep constantly on the lookout for suitable material out of which to organize a Christian Endeavor Society.

2. That good use be made of Bro. W. C. Wampler in organizing and maintaining Christian Endeavor Societies, he having been chosen for that purpose by the Sunday school and Christian Endeavor Convention of the Conference.

3. That we stand by the Board of Religious Education and conform to their plans as far as possible.

The Father who calls, qualifies in spirit and willingness, but the called should not fail to meet that which the Father hath done with preparation of his own efforts; thus proving his stewardship.

We rejoice in the success of the Men and Millions Forward movement. Every department of our work will share the benefits. But the fond hopes, of those through years of patient waiting, are now about to be realized.

At the last session of the Southern Christian Convention, trustees and a Committee on Location, were elected for a school within the bounds of the Alabama or the Georgia and Alabama Conferences. This is gratifying indeed and should receive the heartiest co-operation of all.

We recommend:

That we be faithful to pay all subscriptions to the Men and Millions Forward Movement.

That, in accordance with the request of the Southern Christian Convention, we pool our Educational Fund with the Treasurer of Elon College.

That we license, as a probationer, G. H. Veazey, Jessie Duke, W. T. Meacham and Walter Knowles.

That, as Bro. Brown L. Smith comes to us licensed as an exhorter from the M. E. church, south, we endorse his license for one year.

That we reinstate Rev. J. Taylor as an ordained minister.

That we continue the license of J. E. Amerson, J. C. Knight and J. M. Cifton another year.

That we ordain S. R. Waldrop to the full work of the Gospel Ministry.

That those licensed by this Conference be required to provide himself with a copy of the Principles and Government of the Church and a subscription to **The Christian Sun**.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

Our mission interest in the foreign field is in a flourishing condition. This increase in interest we attribute largely to our Men and Millions Forward Movement.

We heartily endorse the interest that is being manifested in Missions by the women of our Church, and trust that we may soon have a flourishing missionary society for the women in each church.

We recommend that we raise next year one hundred and fifty dollars for this cause.

The report of the Mission Board was again presented as follows:

Immediately after the close of the last session of Conference your Board met and employed Rev. J. W. Elder, at a salary of \$50.00 per month, to take charge of the North Alabama mission. Not having sufficient funds, we borrowed from the Executive Committee \$166.66 from the Educational Fund. The Mission Board of the Southern Christian Convention donated \$300.00 for this work, making a total, with the Mission Funds on hand, of \$731.86. We have drawn on the treasurer as follows:

For Rev. J. D. Dollar, expenses, \$5.00; for Rev. J. W. Elder, salary, \$400.00; for Rev. C. B. Riddle, for Annuals, \$43.75; for Liberty Grove church building, \$200.00. Total, \$648.75. This leaves a balance of \$83.11; and we are due Rev. J. W. Elder \$200.00 more on salary. We are also due the Educational Fund \$166.66. A total deficit of \$66.66. We ask that some provisions be made to pay the indebtedness.

We recommend:

That, if possible, Rev. J. W. Elder be kept in the North Alabama field. Conditions are most inviting and we cannot

afford to neglect it; and, as we see it now, our greatest need is more money and another good man to assist in the work.

That the Conference raise \$250.00 this year.

That we continue Rev. J. W. Elder in the North Alabama field at a salary of \$600.00; and, that we ask the Southern Christian Convention to pay \$300.00 of the salary.

That the great burden of our petitions be a deepening of the spiritual life and passion for souls.

That, we make a special effort to increase our membership ten per cent the coming year.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Among the forces of religious education there must be a growing emphasis placed upon the institution of the Sunday school, until we may see it more gloriously functioning, as it may do, in the discovery and development of Christian leadership, in giving missionary information, and furnishing missionary inspiration, culminating in prayer, the giving of life and money.

Our last Sunday school Convention endorsed the idea for an all-time Field Secretary of Sunday schools, as planned by the Board of Religious Education of the Southern Christian Convention, and decided to ask each Sunday school to send up to the convention ten cents per member enrolled, to provide funds to carry out the above plan. The apportionment of ten cents per member

enrolled for Missions was continued for this year. The reports at our last Convention showed that missionary offerings were nearly double that of the previous year.

We recommend that the subject of missions be kept prominently before our schools.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The three stages of American education: Literary, utilitarian, military—needs a fourth state—Christian education.

Religious and civil freedom dominated this nation for fifty years of its history. Independence and prosperity, invention and scientific discovery, created a desire for wealth in place of character.

The world war transferred thought for the time to military service; and the close of the war re-acted in a wild rush for gain and pleasure. The new day said: "Schools must have larger endowments, better equipment for physical culture and vocational training. The heart of education is in danger of being replaced by financial standards. The teachers are to be measured by knowledge rather than by character." Many of the schools are manned by instructors rather than teachers. The Master was the great teacher—He had great knowledge, but His personality was the great force for His disciples.

All the stages and processes of education fail unless they flower out in Christian Education, which means the Christianizing of schools and students. No learning is too great, provided it stands for "Christian Character First and Always," the motto of Elon College. Elon stands or falls by this motto, and its support by the Church is the indorsement of this position and purpose in education. We, therefore, reiterate repeated recommendations that our constituency remain true to our own Elon College, which has saved the situation so far as educated ministers enter into the equation of church success. Elon men have put new inspiration and activity into ministers and laymen.

Rev. D. F. Parsons writes from Nashville, Tenn., that he will remain in Vanderbilt University for this year, and may be ready for work after this year, unless he goes to the University of Chicago for a year.

War conditions reduced the number of applications for membership in the Biblical Class, and diverted the minds of some young men, who had been enrolled; but this will, no doubt, correct itself upon return to normal financial and spiritual conditions.

We recommend the name of J. T. Harrod, a member of the South Norfolk Christian church, an applicant for membership in the Biblical Class, and now a student in Elon College.

We regret to report that the Gates County and Ivor pastorates did not meet the conditional requirements of the appropriations made at your last session, but we have formed a pastorate composed of Ivor, Barrett's, Johnson's Grove and Union (Southampton) with Rev. W. B. Fuller as pastor, and to that pastorate we recommend an appropriation of not exceeding \$600.00.

We endorse the evangelistic work of Rev. A. Victor Lightbourne, the Evangelist of the Southern Christian Convention.

The Conference having reduced the resources of the Committee by resolution at its last session, we will be handicapped in our work to that extent.

REPORT OF WOMAN'S BOARD.

Continued growth and development has marked our Woman's Missionary work during the year. Beginning about nine years ago with only a small number of societies and less than \$500.00 in collections, we this year reported 58 organizations and offerings amounting to \$5,223.00. This marvelous growth and development it seems to us, would indicate that our women were ready and waiting for the opportunity of continuing their efforts in the great Missionary task.

Our Men and Millions Movement gave an impetus to our woman's work, while in turn, we feel that this campaign has no more loyal supporters than were to be found among the women in our Missionary Societies. Our annual Conference last week at Holland was enthusiastic. We believe progressive steps were taken. We will continue along the lines of work of last year. The women will raise \$1,200.00 for the support of the Washington, D. C. work as a Home Mission Special, and \$1,200.00 for the salary of a foreign missionary. The Y. P. will raise \$900.00 for the mountain work under Miss Hedgepeth, and a similar amount for the foreign work. We arranged for the grouping of our churches which we think will greatly facilitate the work of organization.

REPORT ON MORAL REFORM.

The great object of the Church is to create such a moral at-

 the many other forms of evil. We believe that the greatest force
 against evil in every form is Christian education. We, therefore,
 recommend that:

1. Greater emphasis be placed upon the restoration of the
 family altar in every home.

2. We encourage in every possible way the teaching of God's
 Word not only in our homes, but in the schools and all other places
 of instruction.

3. Realizing that we must depend largely upon our legisla-
 tures for specific reforms we urge upon our membership not only
 to vote but to vote intelligently for men and measures which will
 best advance those interests.

4. The growing divorce evil threatens the very foundation
 of our Christian civilization, the home. We therefore recommend
 that greater emphasis and safeguards be thrown around the mar-
 riage vows, and our divorce laws be strengthened at least to the
 extent of penalizing the guilty party.

5. We recommend that our membership refrain from the
 use of tobacco and other needless and wasteful habits.

6. That we seek to create public sentiment for enforcement
 of all wholesome laws, such as those against Sabbath desecration,
 for prohibition, etc., by stricter observance of such laws, speaking
 in their favor, and such other means as are within our power.

Forenoon Session.

Conference met and called to order at 10 o'clock. Devotional service conducted by Rev. H. H. Butler. Minutes of yesterday read and approved. Report of the Collectors was submitted and referred to the Committee on Finance. Total Conference collections for the year, \$7,314.

Rev. Stanley C. Harrell was granted a letter of transfer to the North Carolina Christian Conference.

It was moved and carried that the minutes be printed in The Annual and that 600 copies be purchased and distributed pro rata, and sold for 25 cents per copy to individual members, the proceeds of said sale to be sent to the Treasurer of the Conference and placed to the credit of the Conference Fund.

It was moved and carried that the papers read at the Centennial Session last evening be printed in permanent form.

It was moved and carried that the action of the Southern Christian Convention pertaining to the pooling of the Educational Funds of the Conferences be ratified.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

We believe that the Lord is a missionary God, that Jesus is a missionary Christ, and that the Church must be missionary in spirit and activity, with a world outlook and a world program.

God loved the whole world, Jesus died for the whole world, and the Church must undertake to give the gospel to the whole world, if she would be obedient to the divine call to service, and receive divine approval and blessing in her activities for the Kingdom among men.

There is cause for rejoicing that at last an awakening in the interest of Christian Missions has come to the Christian Church and that we are today endeavoring to follow the light of the vision that has dawned upon us. At the same time we need to remember that we stand at the beginning and not at the end of our task. We are just now entering upon the work that should have gripped our hearts and moved us to missionary zeal and sacrifice a century ago.

With the hope that this Conference may enter more heartily and more wisely into the larger program and work of the Church in the evangelization of the world, we would urge the necessity of a campaign of missionary instruction. We would suggest as available, practical means toward this end the judicious distribution of tracts, the reading of missionary publications, particularly the Christian Missionary and the Missionary Review of the World, the organization of mission study classes, the giving of the missionary message in the Sunday school, the Young Peoples Societies, and the regular services of the church, with an occasional missionary pageant wherever possible, emphasizing the place of the pastor on the key man in working out a comprehensive, constructive missionary program in the local church.

During our Men and Millions Campaign a number of our young people in the Conference offered themselves as life-work recruits, there being several among this number who feel that they should dedicate their lives to the service of missions in foreign fields. We commend these young people for the heroic stand they have taken, and urgently call upon our pastors, Sunday school superintendents and teachers, and upon our people in general to keep in personal, prayerful touch with them so that their decisions may be conserved and utilized in the Kingdom.

We would suggest the importance of a definite, well-defined missionary program in each church in the Conference with an annual every-member canvass, and with a regular, systematic offering either weekly or monthly for missions.

We call attention also the imperative need of a hearty cooperation with our Conference and Convention boards, looking towards a more thorough unification of all our forces so that we may approach our task with an undivided front.

We desire, furthermore, to express our conviction as to the need for united missionary intercession. If our missionary work is to succeed, it will do so not through any human ingenuity that we may possess, or through any well-devised human plans that we may formulate, but through the release of divine power in answer to prayer. We, therefore, make the appeal that we give ourselves to prayer and intercession as never before for our secretaries and boards at home, for our work and workers abroad,

and for the lands and nations that know not Jesus Christ, to the end that His saving gospel may be speedily proclaimed unto the uttermost parts of the earth.

We would suggest such a sized book be published that might be sold without profit at an approximate cost of one dollar.

2. That we earnestly urge our churches, pastors, and workers to avail themselves of the advantages offered them by the Seaside Chatauqua and School of Methods at Virginia Beach. This annual program of religious education is one of the most vital institutions in our midst, and every effort should be made to have our life Recruits, Sunday school leaders, Christian Endeavor workers and church officials avail themselves of this opportunity to train for Christian leadership.

3. That the President appoint a Conference Forward Movement Committee of five, corresponding to the five points of the movement; said committee to co-operate in every possible way with the plans and program of the movement, helping the Church Forward Movement Committees to function and encouraging them in our larger work.

4. That we urge all our churches to complete the Men and Millions Campaign, to meet their obligations promptly, and to put on the full Forward Movement program, appointing a Forward Movement Committee of five, one representing each of the five points of the movement, using the group plan of organization to help build our churches into stronger and more efficient working bodies.

5. That we express, by rising vote, our appreciation of the generous hospitality of the church and friends of the Holy Neck Christian church in entertaining the Centennial Session of our Conference. We congratulate the church in that it is undertaking a much larger program of work under the splendid leadership of its pastor, the Rev. William Mason Jay. Nothing has been lacking in any way, to make our session a profitable one, in so far as the friends of this church could make it so.

6. That we express to Dr. C. H. Rowland, our retiring President, our great appreciation of his faithful and efficient service rendered the Conference during the period of eight years as its President. We recognize his uniform courtesies and impartiality as a presiding officer.

MEMOIR—REV. JOHN T. KITCHEN.

“How well he fell asleep!
Like some great rivers, widening toward the sea;
Calmly and grandly, silently and deep,
His life joined eternity.”

In the good providence of God this Conference has been bereft of one of its oldest ministers in the person of Rev. John T. Kitchen, who passed from labor to reward at the Protestant Hospital, Norfolk, Va., on October 8, 1920.

This beloved brother was licensed to preach the gospel at Cypress Chapel, Nansemond County, Virginia, during the annual session of this Conference held there in the year 1873. Having proven his gifts as a minister, he was ordained two years later, during the sitting of the Conference at Berea, Nansemond County, Virginia, 1875, and thence forward for many years he was an active pastor, serving several churches within the bounds of his Conference. He also spent several years in pastoral work in the Virginia Valley Conference, and still later, he did some work in the pastorate of the Greentown Christian church, Indiana.

Later his pastoral labors were hindered by a serious throat trouble, but he did occasional preaching as opportunity afforded in various parts of the Master's vineyard. He also frequently used his gifted pen in our Church paper, and so won for himself a place in the hearts of our Brotherhood. His last sermons were preached in a series of meetings at Oak Grove in Gates County, N. C., a few weeks before his death. His last article appeared in the columns of *The Christian Sun* the week he died. It seemed prophetic of his approaching demise, the theme being, “Nearing Home.” We judge from its contents that he had some presentment of his early departure, and in this delicate way bade his many readers an affectionate farewell. By the time the article appeared he was cold in the embrace of death.

In his long ministry he had made a host of friends, as was so well attested by the multitude who attended the funeral services which were held over his remains at Mt. Carmel church in Isle of Wight County, Virginia, on Sunday afternoon, October 10, 1920. His body was laid to rest beside the remains of his first wife who was Mrs. Thomas M. Murray (nee Miss Bettie Duck), a daughter of the late Major I. W. Duck. Some years after her death he was again married to a lady of the Virginia Valley, and after a few

years of happy married life, she was called home in death. During the remainder of his life he lived alone at Windsor, Va.

He was a good man and was loved by a host of friends and acquaintances. He was held in high esteem by his brethren in the ministry, and by the churches he had served in his earlier ministry. He passed away in his seventy-fifth year. He had no near relative living. Among the last acts of his life was a visit to Mrs. Dizie Brantley in Southampton County Va., now in her 100th year. She was his nurse in his childhood, and he never forgot her, but periodically visited her in her home thus giving her indications of his appreciation of her care of himself when a child. These visits were not only beautiful, but they portrayed the character of the man.

Verily a good man has gone to his reward, and this Conference has a vacant chair in its circle. Therefore be it resolved,

1. That in the death of our beloved Brother, we have lost a fellow-servant, a faithful co-laborer in the Gospel ministry. Brother beloved and a genial companion in the social circle.

2. Resolved, That we give public expression to our sorrow because of his death, and so testify to our high estimate of his life and labors as a Christian minister.

3. Resolved, That a copy of this Memoir be sent to the executor of his estate and that a copy be recorded in the minutes of this Conference, and further, be published in **The Christian Sun** and **The Herald of Gospel Liberty**.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your Committee on Sunday Schools beg to report the following:

Our Sunday school work is not going forward as it should, but is in our opinion, losing ground—if we may base our judgment on past reports of the work.

One year ago, 104 schools reported to this Conference, showing a membership of 8,640. This year only 43 schools (four less than a year ago) recognized in any way our Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Convention, and four of these schools sent dues only. Our last Convention was attended by more pastors and fewer delegates; yet we feel that the Convention was a great success, furnishing as it did much inspiration for those delegates and pastors who did attend.

This Convention meets annually, the second week in July, and should have at least one representative from every church in this Conference.

The Board of Religious Education recently elected Miss Lucy M. Elderedge field secretary for the Southern Christian Convention. She will begin her duties as such about August 1, 1921, and your committee anticipates more activity among our schools in the future.

We therefore recommend the payment of the \$200.00 so generously donated to the Board of Religious Education, by this Conference last year, not later than August 1, 1921.

We recommend that the name of H. W. Carter, at his own request, be dropped from the roll, and also that of R. A. Truitt be dropped, as he has united with the M. E. Church, South.

I. T. Underwood is doing Christian work as he has opportunity and is planning to enter college as soon as possible.

G. C. Crutchfield is pursuing his studies in the Freshman Class at Elon College. He served one church last year and is open to work for the coming year.

R. H. Coble is unable to be in school on account of his health and other conditions, but is preaching and doing other Christian work as he has opportunity.

D. T. McKinney has served one church this year and is open to work for another year.

R. O. Smith is continuing his studies in Elon College.

W. J. Edwards and J. E. McCauley are recommended by their churches for ordination. After examination we recommend their ordination.

Biblical Class.

W. T. Scott continues his studies in Elon College.

John Scoggins has joined the Wesleyan Methodist Church and we recommend his name be dropped.

J. F. Cook has not reported to this committee.

Sion M. Lynam, Route 4, Apex, N. C., a member of Martha's Chapel church and a freshman in Elon College, applies for license at this Conference. We recommend his licensure.

William S. Jordan, of Brown's Chapel church, Spies, N. C., has applied for licensure. After examination and due consideration the committee does not feel warranted in recommending his licensure.

We recommend that Carl Brady, of Pleasant Grove, Randolph, be admitted to the Biblical Class.

We recommend that this Conference indorse the following resolution adopted at the last session of the Convention: "That the ministerial education fund of the various conferences and of the Convention be pooled at Elon College, that the treasurer of the College be their custodian, and that the Board of Education of the Southern Christian Convention be empowered to order the loan of these funds upon the recommendation of the Conferences."

Forward Movement.

We have considered the letter of the Superintendent of the Forward Movement of the Christian Church referred to us, and it is the sense of this committee that our Men and Millions Forward Movement should be completed through our present organization rather than by the addition of a new one.

Recommendations.

We recommend that \$200.00 be loaned to G. C. Crutchfield and \$200.00 to S. M. Lynam to aid them in college the present session on the condition that they remain in college the whole session and fail to secure church work above that they now have. If they secure additional work the loans to be scaled in proportion to the net proceeds of such additional work.

Amendment.

The following amendment to the report was introduced by Rev. C. B. Riddle and unanimously passed:

Moved that all members of the Biblical Class and Licentiates of the North Carolina Conference be required to own a copy of the Government and Principles of the Christian Church, and also that each be a subscriber to **The Christian Sun**; this amendment to remain on the records of this Conference and to remain in force until revoked by this body in regular session.

CHRISTIAN UNION.

Christian Union is an inviting theme to the Christian Church. We came into being to bring this very thing to reality. Our hearts rejoice that during the years of our history the various denominations have grown steadily more fraternal and co-operative in their relations toward each other. We regret, however, in this day of great opportunity for the Church, that our 183 denominations of Protestants in America render it impossible for the Church to enter into the open door of service and victory for the Kingdom as largely as we might with a united force.

We firmly believe that an unregenerated world is the price we pay for a divided Christendom. The hour has arrived for the Churches of Christ to repent of their sectarianism, and to bring forth fruits meet for repentance. Only by a united Church can the Kingdom of Jesus fully come. Our Master prayed for the oneness of His followers. Why? "That the world may believe that thou hast sent me," he declared, as the reason, and it is useless for Christians to pray "Thy Kingdom Come," while they make its coming impossible by their sectarian and affronting division.

We rejoice in the great work of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America and we are glad that from the first our American Christian Convention has participated in this most potent force that has yet appeared in the realm of practical Christian co-operation.

We are glad that this Conference has created a Standing Committee on this vital issue of modern Christian statesmanship. We recommend that this committee's functions be defined as reporting to each annual session the progress of the Christian Union idea in the Church, making overtures to other denominations relative to the matter of Christian Union, furnishing articles for Church papers, our own as well as other weekly papers, on the general theme of Christian Union and arranging for speakers as for as practicable to carry by the spoken word to other religious gatherings through our own, the message of our Church relative to Christian Union and inviting others also to bring their message to us.

The church of North Clayton with 67 members was admitted to membership in the Conference.

It was ordered to transfer the savings account of \$201.82 to the Home Mission Funds and to request the Home Mission Board to reimburse the Conference Fund for the \$150.00 paid for the church at Needham's Grove.

Secretary was instructed to secure reports on Conference funds for all churches not reporting at this session, and to have results of same included in *The Annual*.

It was ordered to print the minutes in *The Christian Annual*, taking the usual number.

The Secretary was authorized to draw draft on the Treasurer for funds belonging to the Home Mission Board and to the Southern Christian Convention and to pay all items approved for payment at this session.

It was voted to instruct the President to secure the three gavels of the three former Conferences and to have them made into one.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Our hearts are profoundly grateful for the Missionary awakening among our people. In this day of enlarged opportunity our beloved Church is coming into her own. She is mobilizing her forces and concentrating on her God-given task. She is getting a vision of world tasks and greatly enlarging and expanding her program of service.

We are glad to report progress in our Foreign Mission work. Five new workers have been placed in the field: Rev. and Mrs. W. Q. McKnight to Japan; Rev. and Mrs. W. H. Martin, Porto Rico, and Miss Toshio Sato, Japan. Rev. and Mrs. D. P. Barrett and family and Rev. E. C. Fry are at home on furlough. Mrs. Fry is expected some time in early spring. The Japan work suffered a very severe loss in the passing away of one of our ablest and best beloved missionaries. Dr. E. K. McCord, on April 26, 1920, was called to his eternal reward.

We desire to express our great appreciation of the most splendid work that is being prosecuted by our Southern Convention. We recognize the unusual missionary zeal and liberality demonstrated by our members of the Southern Convention, and that we further commend them in their determined desire to undertake a work carrying with it tremendous responsibilities in carrying the gospel into China.

This indicates an increased interest in the mission work and larger things for our Church along missionary lines. We recommend that more of our Sunday schools emulate the example of the Burlington Sunday school in placing workers in the foreign field.

The work of the women is very encouraging and shows a decided increase in new organizations and finances.

Your committee offers the following recommendations:

1. That pastors, Sunday school superintendents and leaders in our churches be urged to prayerfully promote the missionary cause in all congregations and to fully awaken them to the missionary obligations.

2. That missionary societies be organized in all of our churches and that pastors co-operate with the women and render them all the assistance possible in organizing such societies.

3. That definite missionary instructions be given in all Sunday schools and that at least one offering each month be devoted to missions.

4. That March and April be designated as foreign mission study months and that during that period mission study classes be conducted for men, women and children.

5. That the pastors of this Conference endeavor to place **The Christian Missionary** in as many homes as possible. This magazine is worthy of a place in every home.

6. That Life Recruit Service be held by our pastors in their churches and that the call to Christian service in foreign lands be laid upon the hearts of our young people.

7. That churches, Sunday schools and missionary societies consider the advisability of furnishing equipment for stations,

fields and missionaries, as well as support for missionaries. We commend Catawba Springs for undertaking to build a church in the foreign land, also the John R. Foster missionary class for the work of educating a native worker in Porto Rico.

REPORT OF HOME MISSION BOARD.

We desire to first record our whole hearted and sincere gratitude for the new era in the Christian Church that has dawned upon us within the year. There has been an awakened and quickened spirit plainly evidenced within the churches during the year and our people have unmistakably registered their hearty approval and co-operation through the Men and Millions Forward Movement and many other ways. Certainly no people have within a year's time been born anew in a greater realization of the opportunities and possibilities that were within each individual life. Last year our need was money. This year that need is greater but the greatest need is a cultivation of the awakened and enlightened mission spirit among our people. We record our faith in the full development of the talents entrusted to each individual life and as this is done and each individual begins to realize his responsibilities and opportunities the great mission spirit now so evident will be even more quickened and enlivened. We pray God that His blessings may rest upon each individual in our Conference and that he may be filled with a desire to properly use the influence and talents entrusted to him.

The Board this year has more appeals for assistance than ever before, in assisting the small churches in paying pastors, because of the lack of interest and various other hindrances that prevented some of our small churches from getting the best results. We had more pastorless churches to begin with than ever before and it was necessary to assist some of them in paying a pastor. This was done with the idea in mind of grouping the churches so that the small churches might as far as possible be so grouped as

to enable them to secure a pastor's service in connection with the larger churches. This arrangement cannot be completed within a year but will come in time by keeping at it.

The Work In Detail.

At Chapel Hill the work has made progress under Brother R. F. Brown. The parsonage has been practically completed and debt reduced to \$900.00, the board assisting to the extent of \$500.00. Rev. B. J. Howard has been called to serve them another year and the Board has agreed to pay \$200.00 on his salary.

Reidsville, under the efficient leadership of Rev. W. L. Wells, has made decided advancement. The Board supplemented his salary there this year in connection with the S. C. C. Board making his salary \$1,400.00 for Reidsville and Happy Home. The balance of debt in the amount of \$500.00 is to be liquidated at an early date. Reidsville's future looks very bright.

Danville has gone forward by leaps and bounds. All indebtedness has been wiped out by the church itself and every call as the Men and Missions Forward Movement and others responded to whole heartedly and met in full. The Board paid \$500.00 toward pastor's salary. Rev. J. E. McAuley was their pastor and has been re-elected with an increased salary. The church is preparing to build a parsonage and the Board voted to give them \$200.00 whenever the work shall have started and expresses regret that it cannot give these determined people more substantial assistance. We bespeak much for Danville and under the leadership of these capable brethren it will soon be a strong, vigorous church.

The work at Franklinton is also making progress under the efficient leadership of Rev. B. F. Black whose untiring efforts are bearing fruit. The church has been started and will soon be in condition for worship to be held in it, though not completed. The Board has appropriated \$500.00 per year as has the S. C. C. Board for Franklinton for five years to meet the local proposition. With Rev. B. F. Black at the helm Franklinton will soon be one of our most influential churches.

Rev. J. E. Franks has started a church at Clayton under the direction of the Board. A lot at a cost of \$650.00 has been purchased and paid for by the local people. The Board has agreed to help these people on a 50-50 basis with the endorsement and co-operation of the S. C. C. on the same basis. The church now has 68 members and is exceedingly anxious to go forward with the building. The work gives promise under Brother Franks' leadership of supplying a real need of a church in that immediate community and the Board approves and commends his efforts.

At Hopedale a church has been built at a cost of approximately \$1,800.00 and has been paid for by the local people with the exception of \$200.00 supplied by the Board. The Board appreciates the good work done by these people, especially Brother A. H. McIver. The church is in a position to do a good work and has secured Rev. J. F. Apple to again serve them, the Board again helping to pay him to the extent of guaranteeing him \$100.00, the local church to continue to take their usual offering for the pastor and to finish the church as early as possible. The building is in keeping with the town and was approved by the Board.

At Mebane under the direction of Rev. H. Scholz and the loyal and faithful little congregation, the work has progressed very nicely. The small band worked faithfully in the Forward Movement and did well. The church is not finished, but they hope to finish it at an early date. The Board assisted in paying the pastor this year and will again assist when a definite proposition comes from them. They have secured Rev. P. T. Klapp to serve them another year.

The work at Addor has made progress this year under the direction of Rev. G. R. Underwood, whom the Board secured to serve them with their assistance. They paid the pastor their part of the agreement in full and extended him a unanimous call for another year. Brother Underwood has accepted, the Board agreeing to supplement the local people's salary to the extent of \$75.00. There is a real opening for the church at Addor and we have a very creditable building in good condition generally. The outlook is indeed promising at Addor.

Pleasant Union has been assisted this year in paying a pastor. Rev. L. W. Fogleman served them this year, the Board supplementing his salary in the amount of \$50.00. The church did not progress owing to adverse influences at work in the community. However there was several additions to the church and the church generally was revived.

The Board has had numerous calls for help and there are a number of pastorless churches. The Executive Secretary was directed to assist them in securing pastors as soon as possible. The Board recommends that churches not now using some kind of system in their raising of finance, co-operate with the Executive Secretary in putting some kind of system into effect.

The Executive Secretary was re-elected and the Conference is asked to co-operate with him and to use his service to the best advantage wherever needed.

REPORT ON MORAL REFORM.

We are thankful unto God that the real Church of Christ has always stood for a high moral standard of living. From the time the Church was first established down to the present day, its mission has been to reform the world and to save the world. Today, possibly, as never before the Church is confronted with a task which demands the prayerful co-operation of the whole Church, to the end that immorality may be eliminated and every kind of evil that would tend to lower the moral tone and chill the spiritual life of our people done away.

We are living in an age of testing, in an age in which immorality is playing a strong hand, and the danger lies in the fact that the Christian home and the Church are too ready to compromise with too many of the so-called "no-harm" things of the world, instead of taking a firm stand against every appearance of evil and doing all in their power to reform the world.

If the moral standard of the age in which we live is ever lifted higher, it must be done by the Christian homes and the Church as a whole. If not by these it will never be done. There will be no reformation. On the other hand the practice of immorality will increase and continue to sweep our young rising generation into the whirling cess pool of sin and vice.

If the parents of our day would have their children to be moral and Christian, let them first be moral and Christian themselves. Let morality and Christianity go from the home into the church and from the church into the world.

Your Committee would recommend that this Conference body set its stamp of disapproval upon the following evils:

1. The desecration of the Sabbath.
2. Card playing and gambling in every form.
3. The theater and moving picture show as it is now conducted.
4. That we discourage the use of tobacco in every form.
5. The use of soft and alcoholic drinks.
6. Mob violence.
7. Extravagance and immodesty in dress.
8. Public dancing.
9. That this Conference voice its sentiment against the inaugural ball, and the secretary of this Conference be authorized to write President-elect Harding a letter stating to him the atti-

tude of this body against such unchristian performance, and request him not to restore the precedent broken by President Wilson.

10. We would urge our people to establish the family altar, the daily reading of the word of God and to "pray without ceasing" and that our Church strive not to be overcome with evil, but to overcome evil with good.

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

Your Committee desires to direct the attention of the Conference and all its constituency to the necessity of becoming a reading people, one of the necessary steps toward an educated people. The thousands of books written and published each year is a great testimony that the mind is seeking new thought. It is incumbent upon the Church to direct so that all thought may be made a power for the Church instead of a power against it. If the Church could direct and control the press of the country it would be one of the greatest achievements in all Christendom. The religious press has a more difficult time presenting its views to the world than the secular press. The Church cannot afford to lose any opportunity in giving every possible advantage to the religious press, that it may be able to live, to function, and to fulfill its great mission in the world.

We record with interest the financial distress of all church publications. Our own publications, **The Christian Sun**, **The Herald of Gospel Liberty**, and **The Christian Missionary** are laboring under most difficult circumstances for their financial existence. The great pioneer work that they have done, and are doing, fully justifies their right to live, and we take counsel with this body for any suggestion that may be offered to aid in the financial distress of our publications.

The Herald of Gospel Liberty is the official organ of the Christian Church, and the oldest religious newspaper in the world. It is ably edited and deserves a much larger circulation than it has.

The Christian Missionary should be in every home that the spirit of missions may be kept alive and our people at home kept in touch with our workers abroad. Its price of fifty (50c) the year is too small for it to be debarred from so many of our splendid homes.

The Christian Sun, the official organ of our Southern Convention, now in its seventy-fifth year of existence, deserves more than a passing consideration. Wherever **The Christian Sun** goes, the lamps of interest are lighted and progress for the Kingdom follows. It should be in every home. But that is only a dream that all Church publications have ever sought, and yet have never realized. The small circulation of **The Sun** may at times seem discouraging, but if **The Sun** were withdrawn from our territory, we are of the opinion that church leaders would have a more difficult task in combining forces for the larger good of our work.

We, therefore, call upon this Conference to help in extend-

ing *The Sun's* circulation, thereby extending its usefulness. We commend the Board of Publication for its recent act in increasing the subscription price and call upon the people to stand by the publication in its endeavor to succeed, financially, and otherwise.

We commend again the reading and diligent study of the Holy Scriptures in our homes.

We commend to our people the books written by members of our own denomination, and bespeak for these authors and their kind the best wishes of our body.

Again we commend our Sunday school literature and call upon all churches to adopt its use. It is prepared by our people and for our people and should be supported by our people.

We record our appreciation of the Revision Committee of the Southern Convention in its work of revising the Government and Principles of the Church, and hope that its publication will soon be.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY TO NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE.

It was with much hesitancy that I accepted the call of your Mission Board into its service last November at the Annual Conference at Burlington. Not that I was not willing to accept a call to duty, but through fear of my inability and unpreparedness, I did hesitate to enter upon so great an undertaking.

Eleven months have come and gone since I went into the service. Many things have occurred within that time that brought both joy and regret. I have visited homes that were so low in Christian morale and outlook on life within our North Carolina Conference as to make one feel that our dear Church was asleep on the job. I have gone into churches that were so near dead that a benediction would be a waste of time, yet the community was fully abreast of the times in every other enterprise. I have gone into the homes of pastors who had given their life, and in a great measure sacrificed the future of those entrusted to their immediate care in an endeavor to uplift their fellow man and give him a real vision of life and were receiving in return the mere pittance of a living and hardly the common courtesy due the most vicious man in the community. I have heard pastors preach sermons to a people anxious and hopeful for truths and inspiration, that were prepared twenty-five years ago and were at that time seventy-five years out of date. Yet with it all and much more I have been able to catch a vision of a real awakening on the part of both the people and the pastors as to their relationship one with the other and a real desire to be more helpful and appreciative of one another. And I think it one of the greatest and surest signs of a real progress in our Church. When the pastor and people realize fully their utter dependence on one another and the influence each exerts on the other it will be indeed an awakening and the sure sign of a better day in the churches, and if the Home Mission Board through its members and I as its servant are

privileged to spend this day then we will have much over which to rejoice.

Last December when I began, among my first duties was the getting pastors for fourteen pastorless churches. This was accomplished by Christmas with the exception of two churches. These two exceptions were devoid of interest and one of them was not willing to meet the pastor at the railway station if the Board would pay all expenses. During the month of January, I worked to secure new members in the Home Mission Board and continued efforts in this direction until the Forward Movement was launched. During the period that the Movement was on, I was privileged to work in the office of secretary of organization and in the field. This work was very helpful to me by way of helping me getting acquainted with the people and above all in working under the inspiration of Drs. Harper and Atkinson and Rev. C. B. Riddle. In July I again took up the work of Mission Secretary, using my efforts toward helping the various weak churches raise their Conference apportionments and to systematize their finance, also to help make out their budgets for another year, using whatever method or system that seemed best suited to each particular church. I was privileged to get some kind of system started in 14 churches and in the majority of them they have their Conference apportionments and pastors' salary pledged for another year, also the other incidental expenses. I also have encouraged Sunday school work by making talks along that line and in any other way that would help increase interest. I have attempted to assist all church work in general, through mission propaganda.

I have visited 67 churches during the year, made 52 talks and addresses, wrote 1,200 letters and secured 31 new members in the Home Mission Board, totaling \$270.00. I have collected approximately \$650.00 on pledges, making to date 254 members; 18 have withdrawn during the year for various reasons and 26 have asked to be allowed to hold over or allowed to miss paying their dues this year and to take it up again next year. The memberships total a little above \$2,000.00.

It is my hope during the coming year to assist in obtaining a better understanding between pastors and people as to their relationship that there may be a better co-operation between them, also to help in securing more adequate pay for the pastors that their efficiency may be increased and to put some kind of system regarding finances to work in every church that does not now have one, that the churches may be able to more efficiently and more satisfactorily raise their church finances.

benefits of Christian Endeavor. It will be a good day for our Church when in every church there is an active Christian Endeavor society.

Your Committee is glad to note that the Board of Religious Education is to put in the field a secretary who is to give full time to the work. We urge that each church assist her in her work, and permit her to assist them in arranging and carrying on the work of Christian Endeavor.

We recommend:

1. That our pastors give careful attention to the organization of a Christian Endeavor society in each church. If they need help, then they should call on the Christian Endeavor Secretary of this Conference.

2. That there should be given a place on the Church Letter to Conference for a report of the Christian Endeavor society.

2. That The Christian Sun, Herald of Gospel Liberty, The Christian Missionary, and our various Sunday School publications, including The Teachers' and Officers' Journal, have a prominent place in our reading because of their inspirational and practical value in all our work.

3. That the attention of our people be called to the helpful Sunday School, Christian Endeavor, and missionary books, which may be obtained through our Publishing Houses, and that our people be urged to patronize our own Publishing House when in need of any church and Sunday school supplies.

The goal of the moral reformer can only be reached when people apply in private life and public life the principles as set forth in the Sermon on the Mount.

We, therefore, recommend:

1. That our ministers and laymen of the Church co-operate in the great magnanimous task of destroying all social evils which confront us today, such as drinking alcoholic liquor, dancing, gambling and all forms of mob violence, etc.

2. That we endorse public amusements only so far as clean, wholesome, and elevating.

3. That we seek to provide wholesome expression of the social life of our young people.

4. That we condemn all forms of graft and dishonesty in the business world.

5. That we discourage the use of tobacco in all its forms.

6. That we as Church people remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy.

7. That we pray that the law of love may reach out its embracing arms to the four corners of the earth and draw us together in bonds of unity, giving peace and happiness to all the world.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION

It was demonstrated in the great world war that the man with the untrained mind as compared with the man with the trained

mind, was, as a fighting unit, only 75 per cent efficient. In other words, the man with the untrained mind, other things being equal, was only three-fourths of a man. If men with trained minds are necessary in time of war, they are equally necessary to meet the opportunities and solve the problems of peace.

But while it is important that we seek the fullest development of the mental powers it is more important that these powers be under the guidance and control of the spiritual. Sharpened tools are a great blessing when under the domination of a constructive spirit, but a great curse if dominated by a destructive spirit. Therefore, the urge of Christian education, with the emphasis on "Christian."

We rejoice in the continued prosperity of Elon College, and urge the fullest patronage of this our school by the members of this Conference.

We recommend:

1. That the pastors and churches take note from year to year of any boys and girls of their congregations who are in their senior year in high school, using their influence to turn them to Elon for their college training; also send a list of the names of any such to Dr. W. A. Harper in order that he may use his persuasive powers to the same end.

2. That punctuality in the payment of pledges to the Men and Millions Movement be observed, as our educational interests are, to a certain degree, dependent on the prompt payment of these subscriptions.

3. That our Sunday schools and Christian Endeavor Societies take steps to furnish a workers' library for the use of their workers.

4. That Bro. L. R. Townsend, who sends us an excellent report of study and religious work done during the past year, be continued in the Biblical Class for another year.

5. That Bros. W. M. Clem and J. T. Marshall be continued in the Biblical Class. Bro. Clem is in Elon College doing splendid work, and Bro. Marshall expects to enter Elon this fall.

6. That this Conference go on record as endorsing "The Church's System of Education" as set forth by the Board of Education of the Southern Christian Convention.

7. That all licentiates and members of the Biblical Class be requested to purchase a copy of the Government and Principles of the Christian Church, and be a subscriber to The Christian Sun.

We most heartily endorse the work done at our Seaside Chautauqua, and wish that every pastor in this Conference, would seek to attend its annual gathering, and that every Sunday school and Young People's Society should strive to have one or more of its workers present at the Chautauqua each year.

It is very encouraging to learn that our people are awakening as never before to the great need and crying demand for trained leaders for all phases of Christian work. As is almost universally recognized Christian Endeavor is the training station of the church. We can scarcely see how any church can afford not to have a Christian Endeavor Society.

As far as we can learn there have been no new Societies organized within this Conference during the past conference year. The one at Newport, which became inactive last summer, has been reorganized, and is doing splendid work now. The other six, so far as we can learn, are progressing very nicely.

We recommend:

1. That the pastors and leaders in the churches endeavor to organize a Christian Endeavor Society in every church in the conference that does not already have one, where at all practicable, during the next conference year.

Many times those who are influenced by this movement have been lead to decide for their life's work and have become efficient in Christian service. We have at this time only one society which is doing good work, and would urge that the work be presented to all the churches.

REPORT OF MISSION BOARD

This has been the hardest year in the history of our mission work, but in the midst of hardship the Lord has wonderfully blessed our efforts. We have erected two churches in North Alabama. These churches are not finished, but are in condition for use and services are being regularly held in each of them. We have had Rev. J. W. Elder employed for one-half time this year to look after our work

in this mission field. We heartily commend him for his efforts and the success which has attended him. Our work is growing in North Alabama just as we expected and just as we desired. It has passed the experimental stage and now assumes business proportions. We now need more money in our work.

One man can no longer successfully carry this work. We must have more help. We recommend:

First: That we ask our Woman's Missionary Board to assume the support of one missionary in that field for one-fourth of his time.

Second: That we ask our Convention Board to continue to help us support this work for another year; and that we assist both of these churches in securing pastors for next year.

Third: That we raise next year for Home Missions \$250.00.

We endorse and appreciate the purpose of the Southern Christian Convention Board to establish a mission work in China and that we do a full share in supporting the work.

We recommend:

First: That we raise next year one hundred fifty dollars for this cause.

Second: That each church in the Conference have a well organized mission society for we are more successful in raising money through a definite and complete system.

Third: That we read the missionary papers and other literature that we may have a better understanding of the work and a higher conception of our relation to it.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

Your Board has held two meetings—one at Noon Day, on May 28. Not having sufficient data from which to draw plans for work, we decided to meet again at Wadley on June 30 and ask the pastors to meet us; which meeting we held—some of the pastors with us. After discussing the situation, and finding that three of our churches were without Sunday schools and some of our schools were poorly organized, we fixed as our goal: Better organization, a school in every church and two hundred more members than last year.

We have succeeded in organizing schools in two of the churches which had none. According to the reports received we have gained 211 over last year with one church not heard from. We think that our Sunday school work is improving some. We find that most of our schools are evergreen, but our class organization is not what it should be; almost no departmental organization.

We wish to recommend:

REPORT ON EDUCATION

We congratulate Elon College that the Preparatory Department has been discontinued, thus raising the standard of the institution to the point of due recognition among the colleges of the country. We urge the Conference to stand loyally by this institution.

We rejoice as the work goes forward for the establishing of the proposed school for this section of our work. The place for location having been decided upon at Wadley. We call upon this Conference to give its unanimous support to this proposed enterprise of our Church.

5. That we extend the licenses of Jessie Duke, W. T. Meacham, Brown L. Smith, J. E. Amerson and J. C. Knight another year.
6. That the names of John Taylor and J. M. Clifton be dropped from our roll, having joined another church.

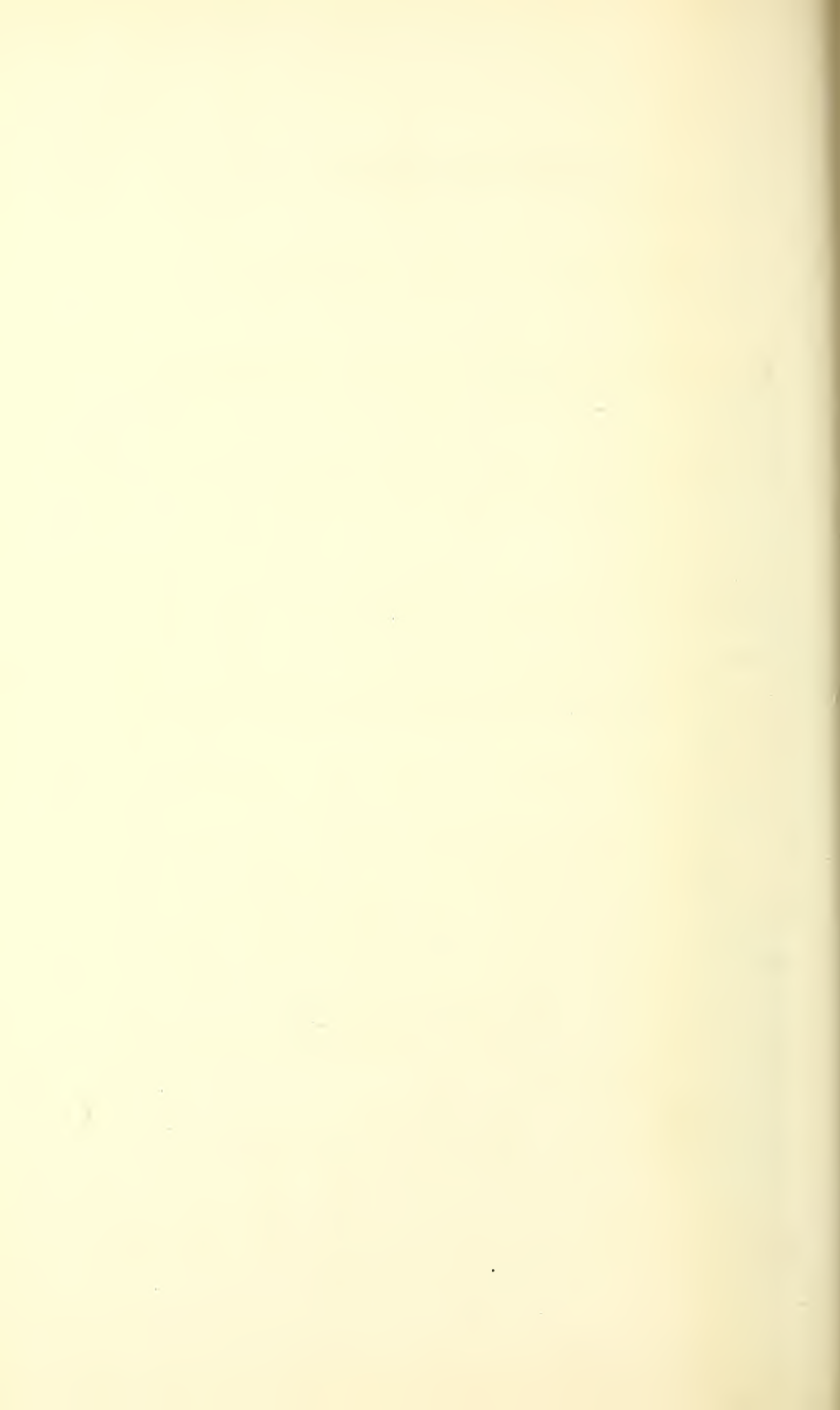

REPORT ON EDUCATION

The public school system has developed a style of architecture that has robbed colleges of their architectural impression upon students. The physical influence of the college no longer furnishes aspiration and inspiration the young.

College standards have been lowered and public school standards have been raised until the college does not loom so large in the eyes of students as in former days. These new conditions raise new problems for colleges, and especially Church colleges. Some new standard must be raised, and some new ground of appeal must put the college above architecture and academic work. That standard might be CHRISTIAN CHARACTER and CHRISTIAN EFFICIENCY. Public schools, professional schools, universities do not make character primary in their work; and none of them propose Christian efficiency as the end of their training.

Elon College has already set up this standard and is trying to maintain it. Money is necessary for an endowed institution; but moral endorsement and students count most in the long run. A full attendance during this generation means continuous patronage. The natural increase in population means larger student body in the years to come. Discouragement should never be written in the book of continuous generations. This human student support of Elon College, in this generation, is what your committee sincerely urges upon the constituency of this Conference. The money and students already put into Elon College have paid the best dividends in useful ministers and Christian workers.

An increase in the number of ministerial students in Elon College this year indicates a return to normal conditions after the war; and pastor N. G. Newman, of the College church, reports improved college conditions in every way this year.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Rev. Dennis F. Parsons writes that he will continue in Chicago University during the present year, and hopes to make his doctor's degree during that time.

J. T. Harrod, of South Norfolk, received last Conference as a candidate for the ministry, continues his studies in Elon College, and desires a loan of \$225.00 to pay his board for the college year, and we recommend that his request be granted.

Harold C. Hainer has been recommended by the First Christian church, of Richmond, Va., as a candidate for the ministry, and we recommend that his name be enrolled, and that his request for a loan of \$150.00 be granted.

We recommend the licensure of J. B. Chadwick of the Wyoming Christian church, Delaware, upon the recommendation of said church, which desires him to become the pastor.

We recommend that ministers of this Conference give ONE WEEK of their summer vacation to pastorless churches, or to assist some weak point in any way needed, by gratuitous service, and wherever such service seems to be appreciated.

A MEMORIAL

Whereas, the population surrounding the Memorial Christian Temple of Norfolk, Va., has so materially changed in recent years, most of the members of the Temple living in other parts of the city, leaving the population largely made up of Jews, Greeks, Italians and Catholics; and the negro population is fast encroaching on the community, and

Whereas, this condition seemed to make necessary for the Memorial Christian Temple, if it desired to continued to grow and function successfully as a church, to secure another location, and

Whereas, Brambleton is sufficiently supplied with churches, making it seem unwise to attempt to make a new location in that section of the city, and

Whereas, many of the members of that congregation were living more conveniently to the Third Christian church, and others were contemplating moving into that community, and

Whereas, that after much thought and prayerful consideration by the respective pastors and some of the leading members in each congregation, it was decided that the interests of the two congregations, the best interest of the denomination and the best interests of the Master's cause would be served by a merging of the two churches into one, and

Whereas, each congregation by unanimous vote on September 25, 1921, agreed to merge their interests, and cease to exist as the churches of the Memorial Christian Temple, and the Third Christian church, and to become a new church to be known as The Christian Temple of Norfolk. Therefore, be it Resolved:

That with the close of this session of the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference the above-named merged churches officially cease to exist, and that the Christian Temple of Norfolk be officially accepted as a member of this Conference and enrolled on the roll of churches.

Resolved further: That all property and available assets of the Memorial Christian Temple be turned over to the new organization, that they be authorized to dispose of the property to the best advantage, and that the trustees of the Conference be authorized to convey the same. And

Furthermore: it is the expressed intention of the Christian Temple of Norfolk that as soon as it is feasible the new church property shall be conveyed to the Trustees of this Conference.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM

Your Committee believes that as a Conference, composed of Christian men and women we should maintain and constantly proclaim, a high standard of morals. Therefore we recommend:

1. That we put our stamp of disapproval on all forms of Sabbath desecration.

2. That we express our disapproval of the modern dance, and gambling in all their forms, and that we request our people to discourage the parlor dance, and card party in every way possible, especially by declining to tolerate such in their homes. We also enter our protest against the teaching of the dance in our public schools.

3. That we keep up the fight against the liquor traffic, and work and pray for a saloonless world, as well as for the keeping of America saloonless.

4. That we stand for clean politics, and urge our membership to inform itself in order to be prepared to vote for men and measures that will give the specific reforms needed for the best interest of the people.

5. That we encourage the reading of the Bible, not only in our homes, but in our public schools, and all other places of instruction.

6. That we put our stamp of disapproval on that modern teaching which tries to explain away the new birth, make parts of the Bible a myth, speaks of Jesus as a mere man, and declare once

more our belief that the Bible is the Word of God, that Jesus Christ is the Son of God, and that the new birth which is brought about by the Holy Spirit and faith in Christ is still the only door into the Kingdom.

7. That we do hereby express our approval of President Harding, in his effort to bring about world peace, and the prevention of future wars, by calling a Conference on the Limitation of Arms, to meet in the City of Washington, D. C., November 11, 1921; and that we pray that out of that Conference may come that which will be for the good of all mankind, and for the best interest of the kingdom of God.

Whereas, A settlement of international disputes by recourse to arms has utterly failed heretofore in effecting a satisfactory or lasting solution of international disputes and differences; and

Whereas, war has entailed and now imposes upon the peoples of the nations of the world great and intolerable burdens of taxation; and

Whereas, The solution of international matters rests on the same basis as the solution of differences between individuals, namely: a solution on the basis taught in the Christian religion; a basis of justice and mutual consideration and forbearance;

Therefore, Resolved: That this Conference urge upon the Conference on Disarmament, in behalf of a world tired of war, and crying for relief from the burdens of taxation and other intolerable consequences of war, that they speedily come to an agreement and understanding by which the armaments of the different nations shall be reduced to the lowest practicable minimum.

Resolved, Further: That the secretary of this Conference forward a copy of this Resolution to Hon. Charles E. Hughes, Secretary of State, and a member of the said Commission.

We also commend to our people the Christian Missionary.

REPORT OF WOMAN'S BOARD

A decade has passed since organized work among our women began. From that year of beginnings, with about twelve organizations and funds amounting to less than \$500.00, we have gone forward with a steady growth unto the present, when we have to report seventy-five organizations, over fifty-eight of last year, and contributions amounting to \$5,695.82. There are thirty-three churches in the Conference wholly or partially organized for our work. Considering the financial depression of the past year this excess of approximately \$200.00 over our goal, we regard as a healthful and hopeful indication. Furthermore we hold that, throughout the bounds of our Conference, missionary zeal has been quickened because of the enlistment of our women in organized effort, and through mission study work in their societies.

The mid-year district meetings arranged for last year were highly successful. Many of our new societies are the result of those meetings. Miss Midyett, who goes to assist Miss Hedgepeth in her mountain work, was influenced to do this through the appeal made at one of our rallies. The challenge of this work is meeting with a hearty response from our young people. They will raise during the coming year \$1,000.00 for the work, and a similar amount for the foreign work. The women have obligated themselves for \$1,500.00 for the Richmond work and \$1,200.00 for our Foreign Missionary elect, for which fund we have on hand more than \$3,000.00 waiting for the man. Our goal for the coming year is \$6,000.00 for all departments of our work.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

We, your Committee on Foreign Missions, beg leave to submit the following report:

That, whereas, we who live in the enlightened lands today must realize the fact that if the course of civilization had not moved

westward, but eastward, instead of America being the Christian nation that it is, sending its hundreds of missionaries and Christian workers to the nations that know not God, the reverse of what now is would probably have been true, and dark and benighted America with its teeming millions would today be hearing the Gospel preached by the Syrian, the Indian, the Chinese, the Japanese and the Malay, pointing us the way out of darkness into light.

However, Western Europe and America have been destined to lie in the way of a rapidly developing civilization, supremely dominated by the Christian religion. Upon these nations, prominent among which is our own beloved America, lies the responsibility of carrying into execution the command of our Master: "Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel." And we, the Christian followers, working within the bounds and under the jurisdiction of the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference must assume our proportionate part of this work of world evangelization.

We have great cause for rejoicing in the enlarged plan of work by the General Mission Board, in which the S. C. C. Mission Board is heartily co-operating. The recent trip of the Foreign Mission Secretary, Rev. W. P. Minton, to Japan, was a valuable and timely one, not only because it gave to our Mission Secretary a broader and deeper and more concrete vision of our Japan work, but because of the information and inspiration that has come and will continue to come to our people from first hand knowledge of our Japan Missions.

And then the more recent visit of Rev. W. P. Minton and Dr. J. O. Atkinson, Field Secretary of Missions of the S. C. C. to Porto Rico to study the interest and welfare of our Mission work there. This will, we believe, tend to advance our Mission work in Porto Rico, and bring about a greater fruitage of our labors there and promote a more hearty support by our local Conference and churches.

We believe that a vigorous campaign of Missionary Education should be kept up in our colleges, Conferences and local churches. Courses of mission study should not only be offered in our colleges, but their value will be duly emphasized in outlining and directing the courses of individual students.

Too much stress can scarcely be given to the organization of mission study classes in the local churches and missionary societies. The reading of mission books should be encouraged. One society that we know of this year purchased eight or ten of the best mission books to be secured, and distributed them among the members of the society with the instructions that they should read within a few weeks and the exchange for another.

In this way a good mission library could be built up, if a few books are added each year by the society. A splendid idea in connection with this plan is to urge the reading of these books by the men in the homes.

The use of mission literature and pamphlets wisely distributed is most practical, and such literature can be had from our publishing headquarters.

Missionary societies with a definite program of work, in every church of the Conference should be a goal definitely sought to be reached. This we believe is one of the objectives of the Woman's Missionary Conference, and here the hearty co-operation of the pastor and such aid as he may be able to give should be sought.

The work of the societies, to do the greatest possible amount of good, should be tied to the whole church program, instead of functioning as though the society was independent of the church. Not only should the societies report regularly to the church, but should occasionally demonstrate their zeal and interest in mission work by means of special programs, pageants, lectures and slides. This tends to arouse the interest of the whole church in missions.

The Christian Missionary should be well represented in every church, and a special committee appointed to look after the new and renewal subscriptions.

We heartily endorse and recommend the plan in all our Sunday schools to set aside the offering of at least one Sunday of each month for missions, and the election of a superintendent of missions who will present the subject of missions, in some way, at least one a month.

We recommend that each church have delegates or representatives to attend missionary Conferences and Convention whether denominational or inter-denominational, and have these report back to the local church. Your Committee is pleased to note a new phase of missionary interest in our Foreign Mission work, and most heartily commends the same.

Already several of the Life Recruits of the Men and Millions Forward Movement have entered upon special preparation for the foreign field in the capacity of medical missionary. At present we have no medical missionary on the field, and the great impetus that missions have derived from the medical missionary in other churches should be sufficient for the encouragement of this phase in our work. We believe it will be a great day for our work, when

our young people complete a thorough training and are added to our present missionary force.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN UNION

We re-affirm our conviction expressed in the report adopted at last session of Conference that the Christian Church can make no larger contribution to the Kingdom at this time than that of bringing the churches of Christ into closer fellowship and co-operation with each other. For more than a century now, we have proclaimed the necessity of Christian Union. In the early days we stood alone in our position. Some thirty years after our movement began, the Disciples of Christ appeared and announced their adherence to the same conviction, based on immersion. The last one hundred years has seen all the churches come closer together in spirit and since 1908 attempt to work together through the Federal Council of Churches of Christ.

The American Council on Organic Union of February 6, 1920, adopted a plan of federal union for American Protestantism. This plan will be submitted to the next session of the American Christian Convention for approval. The World Conference on Faith and Order has had one Conference and another is soon to be held. The Disciples of Christ, through their Commission on Christian Unity, has, during the past year, held several conferences in various parts of the country. We rejoice in all these movements as evidences of the unmistakably approaching answer to our Master's prayer for the oneness of his followers.

Our own Church, besides participating in the American Council on Organic Union, has held several conferences with the Disciples. The Christian Union church, too, has made overtures to us. A very pleasant and profitable informal conference was held at the Ocean View Chautauqua in July, 1921, when Dr. Peter Ainslie, Rev. James M. Crain, Rev. E. O. Watson and other Disciple brethren discussed with some of our own leaders, the issues involved in Christian Union.

We have caused to be printed in The Sun this year a few articles on Christian Union. Our Chairman attended the M. P. Conference at Enfield in November, 1920, and several of our people

their Burlington Conference last week. We gave the M. P. brethren the understanding that we were ready to co-operate with them in every feasible manner relative to their proposed college in North Carolina and in other ways.

We have invited Rev. A. R. Flowers, of the Free Will Baptist church to attend this session of our Conference and to speak for us.

FIRST DAY—EVENING SESSION

In the absence of the President and Vice President, the Secretary called the Conference to order and asked Rev. J. W. Patton to preside. Devotional services were conducted by Rev. J. W. Patton.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

Missions is the keyword for the saving of the world. Truly, the spirit and thought of missions should be carried into every department of our church work. Our Savior's mission to the world should convince us that He was the world's greatest missionary. And after He had worked out His program for missions, He turned it over to His followers and told them to carry it to the uttermost parts of the earth, even to every creature. Mark 16:15.

We are glad to report that our work in the foreign field is prospering now more than it has for several years. We believe that our people would be more interested in our foreign fields if they knew more definitely what had been done and what condition the work is now in, and for that reason we will define the work as best we can.

We have in Japan: Four missionary families, thirteen ordained native pastors, one Bible woman, seven kindergarten teachers, fourteen organized churches, sixteen outposts, eleven branch Sunday schools at Utsunomiya, seven church buildings owned by our people, built in American architecture style. We also own three Japanese buildings that are used for parsonages and preaching places. The total church membership is 1,357. The natives are now giving their pastors a better support. The A. C. C. Board is now planning to put in two or three more buildings in the near future, which is a necessity, and, of course, to enable the Board to do this, we will have to increase our offerings. Having these facts before us we can better anticipate the future of our work in Japan.

Our work in Porto Rico is as follows:

One missionary family, one single lady Missionary, four native preachers, who have charge of the various preaching places—and only one of them ordained, one Bible woman, one kindergarten worker, one industrial school conducted by Miss Williams, four organized churches, nine outposts. Membership of these four churches 255. The total enrollment in Sunday school 685. We have four church buildings. We also have three or four buildings at out

stations, which are used for preaching places. Dr. J. O. Atkinson has recently been there and can give us something fresh from this field.

We are expecting to enter China as a new field, in the near future. This should be done as soon as possible for now is the opportune time, while they are crying "Come over and help us." We have four young men preparing for this field who will be sent forward as soon as they are ready and the means are in hand.

We are grieved over the death of our beloved Brother, Dr. M. T. Morrill, Secretary of the Board of Foreign Missions. We do not murmur, but bow in humble submission to the will of Him who doeth all things well.

Our Mission Secretaries, W. P. Minton and J. O. Atkinson, recently went to Porto Rico to investigate needs and conditions there and to see whether we should continue the work we had begun there or leave same to the natives and other denominations. These brethren report that the various denominations are working harmoniously together there and are not overlapping in their activities. A certain portion of the island has been assigned to us to evangelize and reach for Christ, and in this allotment are about 70,000 souls who, if we do not reach, in all probability will not be reached for our Christ. There is no one else to reach them, and no one else is trying to reach them but us. The responsibility of the salvation of these souls is solely upon us of the Christian Church. Since the return of our Secretaries, and their reports were made, the Mission Board has decided that the greatest immediate need is for a medical missionary and we are praying that God will give us a consecrated physician to be sent to Porto Rico at an early date. Two out of five of all Porto Ricans die without any medical attention whatsoever. We are also under the necessity of building a church house in the town of Santa Isabel at the earliest possible date, and the Board has decided to build as soon as the funds are available.

We, of the Southern Christian Convention, have put \$9,000.00 the past year, into building a missionaries' home in Japan to be occupied as soon as built by the Garmans. We are now to put \$12,000.00 into the building of a kindergarten and night school in which Miss Stacey and others are to teach. This amount is now practically in hand and is to be forwarded at an early date. After this is paid, one half of the foreign mission funds raised by the people of the Southern Christian Convention is to go to the opening and support of a new work in China, and to this is to be added twenty per cent by our American Christian Convention Board.

We have now in training two, possibly three missionaries, who are to go to China for us and we are anxiously awaiting the day when our dear church will be aiding in helping to reach China's millions for Christ. The missionary call was never so urgent, nor the need so great. We feel that one of the best and surest ways in which we can help the work the coming year, is for every pastor to see to it that a Woman's Missionary Society is organized in every church where there is not one already, and, where there is a society, for the pastor to do all he can to help make it a better and more active society.

We urge all our people to subscribe for and read *The Christian Missionary*, published at Dayton, Ohio, at 50 cents a year.

We recommend:

1. That all pastors be requested to preach on the subject of missions one or more times during the year.
2. That each church have a mission day service to consist of songs, recitations, lectures, and offerings.
3. That the teachers in our Sunday schools teach Missions.
4. That we heartily recommend our own *Christian Missionary* to our people as being worthy of their reading.

DISARMAMENT RESOLUTION

W. A. Harper offered the following resolution which was unanimously adopted:

"Resolved, That we appreciate the fact that the President of the United States has called the Disarmament Conference now assembled in Washington, and that we rejoice in the program of practical statesmanship submitted to said conference by the American Secretary of State. We welcome a day such as this in the world's history and congratulate ourselves that our nation is represented in this most auspicious gathering by a group of Christian men whose integrity and character commend themselves to universal approval. We pray that God's Holy Spirit may guide our representatives and the statesmen of the other nations in their deliberations, that His kingdom may come and His will be done on earth as in heaven. We hereby instruct the Secretary of this Conference to transmit this resolution to President Harding and Secretary Hughes."

Rev. W. P. Minton delivered an illustrated lecture on Missions in Japan.

SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION

In the absence of the President, Rev. G. O. Lankford, Vice President, presided.

Devotional services were conducted by Rev. P. T. Klapp. Minutes of the previous session read and adopted.

The following committees on delegates to the Southern Christian Convention were appointed:

Laymen to nominate ministers: W. K. Holt, L. M. Clymer, J. D. Wilkins.

Ministers to nominate laymen: Dr. J. O. Atkinson, Rev. G. R. Underwood, Rev. J. D. Wicker.

Motion carried that we hear with pleasure the announcement of the books being published by Dr W. A. Harper and Dr. W. S. Long.

On motion Dr. W. W. Staley was invited to a seat as a deliberative member.

REPORT ON EDUCATION

Your committee notes the growing interest in education in North Carolina and throughout the country. This forces upon the ministry higher standards of education and efficiency. We urge our candidates for the ministry to seek the most extensive and thorough preparation possible to them. Nothing can be more worthy of a man's best than the ministry of the gospel of Christ. We urge our people to encourage and inspire our candidates to higher and more worthy ideals and to seek by moral and financial support to make it possible for them to attain these ideals.

The influence of Elon College on the ministry of the Southern Christian Convention becomes more evident with the passing years, and the college is seeking to extend and deepen this influence. The courses offered are the most modern and approved, an able and experienced faculty is constantly pursuing advanced work in the summer schools of our great universities, and the faculty and student body cooperate to produce a wholesome Christian atmosphere in which to live and grow.

The elimination of the preparatory department has been followed by an increase in the number of college students and the elevation of the tone of college life. The various religious organizations have coordinated their work in a "Religious Activities Organization," thus economizing time and avoiding over-lapping. This has stimulated interest and increased the efficiency of the religious work of the young people.

The needs of an institution, like that of an individual, increase with growth. We record our grateful appreciation of the moral and financial support given Elon College by this Conference and bespeak for it a continuance and increase of the same.

LICENTIATES

G. C. Crutchfield is in the Sophomore class at Elon College and pastor of Palm Street church, Greensboro. His church has requested his ordination, but we believe it would be best for him to continue his studies further and have more experience in the ministry before receiving ordination.

S. M. Lynam continues his studies in Elon College and has full church work.

I. T. Underwood and R. H. Coble are doing such religious work as opportunity affords in their own communities. They desire to be continued as licentiates and we so recommend.

R. O. Smith continues his studies in Elon College.

We have no direct report from D. T. McKinney, but understand he has been engaged in church work.

CANDIDATES

W. T. Scott, M. T. Sorrell and Elisha Bradshaw have been recommended by their churches for licensure. We have examined them carefully and recommend their licensure. The two first named are in Elon College.

E. C. Brady is now in Elon College and we recommend that he be continued as a candidate.

J. F. Cook has not reported to this committee.

W. B. Terrell of the Burlington church applies for admission as a candidate. We recommend his reception, conditioned on a satisfactory recommendation from his church.

H. E. Crutchfield, of Pleasant Ridge church, Guilford, applies for admission as a candidate. He is recommended by his church and we recommend his reception.

RECOMMENDATIONS

We recommend that W. T. Scott be lent \$150.00 to aid him in paying his college expenses at this session.

We also recommend that W. B. Terrell be lent \$150.00 to aid him in paying his college expenses the present session, conditioned on a letter of recommendation from his church.

We further recommend that in case either should not remain in

college the entire session the amount of the loan be scaled in proportion to the time spent in the college, and that the Chairman of this committee order the payment of these loans in three equal installments—December 1, March 1 and May 1.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

One year ago, out of our 118 churches, 113 Sunday schools, with a membership of 8,610, sent reports to this Conference showing a loss of only one school, while from the same 118 churches, only 27 Sunday schools (16 less than a year ago) were represented at our Annual Sunday school and Christian Endeavor Convention last July at Reidsville, N. C.

If, with less than one fourth of the Sunday schools in our Conference, in a Convention full of grit, enthusiasm, and determination we can show an attendance of twelve pastors, six superintendents, and eighty-three delegates, and adopt eighteen reports (all worth your consideration) and raise \$127.47 for the orphanage; we wonder what would happen in a Convention where at least 75 per cent of the 113 schools were as loyal, faithful and active as the twenty-seven.

Notwithstanding the poor showing of our Convention statistics as stated above, your committee feels encouraged over the report of our Field Secretary, Miss Lucy M. Eldredge, as reported to the Board of Religious Education September 20, covering two months and twelve days active service in the field. At this time she had traveled about 1,425 miles, attended four Conventions and Conferences (including the Chautauqua), held four institutes, visited a number of schools and prayer-meetings, mailed out 1,477 letters and circulars, made sixteen talks, and furnished material for The Christian Sun since August 1.

The Board of Religious Education feels proud of the action of this Conference in donating the sum of \$200.00 to this work. We believe that this is going to be our hardest year, financially, and while there are not enough funds in the treasury to finance our Field Secretary for three months, we have confidence in our Conferences, Conventions, Sunday schools, and Christian Endeavor societies throughout the bounds of the Southern Christian Convention and believe that they will not let this work lag.

The Sunday school being the strong, right arm of the church, from which comes 85 per cent of our church members, 90 per cent of our missionaries, and 95 per cent of our preachers of the gospel, your committee feels that it should have deep and prayerful consideration at this time. We, therefore, recommend:

1. That every school use our denominational literature.
2. That each school place in its curriculum a teacher training course.
3. That every Sunday school put forth its best effort to reach the ten points as set by our Sunday school board for a standard school.
4. That every Sunday school in this Conference be urged to send to our Mission Board at least one Sunday's collection in each month.
5. That this Conference renew its allegiance to its Sunday schools by setting aside the second week in July of each year as

"Our Convention Week," and donating to the Sunday school work, through the Board of Religious Education, the sum of \$200.00 to be paid not later than March 1, 1922.

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

Your committee feels that just as secular press is one of the most powerful factors in shaping the destiny of secular affairs, so, likewise, the religious press is one of the most powerful factors in determining the destiny of religious affairs. There has never

been a time when there has been such a wealth of religious literature as at the present day. But your committee feels that, as a people, we are not reading religious literature as we should. We recommend to our people our religious publications: The Christian Sun, The Herald of Gospel Liberty, The Christian Missionary, our own missionary organ, which should be in the homes of our people. We are confronted with a peculiar situation. Our Church publications are suffering financial losses, being unable to meet their operating expenses. While there are a great many homes sorely in need of religious literature, the problem then is to bring the two together to the help and blessing of both. We bring this especially to the attention of the pastors, believing that they can do more than any one else to meet the situation, and believing also that by placing the church paper in the homes of his parish, he will be paving the way for the advancement of all the enterprises of his church. We note with gratification the wide attention that the recent works of Dr. W. A. Harper have attracted. We deplore the fact that more of our ministers do not do more serious writing for the press, concerning our work and the things we are striving to do. For herein lies a powerful agent ready and waiting to be used.

We urge our people to a more diligent reading of religious literature. Especially do we urge that our people be constant and diligent in the reading and study of the Bible, for it is the inspired word of Almighty God.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

Most encouraging reports come to us from churches to which appropriations have been made showing that funds so used have been wisely expended.

The Board was asked to take up notes held by D. C. Tharington and secured by the property of the Raleigh and Franklinton churches, respectively, the amount due on these notes being \$1,250.00. W. K. Holt and the Chairman were elected a committee to investigate the validity, against the Board, of these notes, and if it is found that the Board is responsible for their payment, the Treasurer be instructed to pay them as funds can be secured.

Rev. J. E. Franks states that North Clayton church has raised \$2,150.00 to meet an offer of the Board to appropriate to that church as much as the church raised. The church was asked to submit to the Executive Committee plans and specifications of the proposed building, and if these are accepted by the Committee, an appropriation is to be made to the church this year not to exceed \$2,250.00, to be paid as soon as the funds are in hand.

An appropriation of \$50.00 was ordered to pay on salary of Rev. J. F. Apple for services at Hopedale the past year.

It was ordered that an appropriation of \$50.00 be paid to Rev. J. D. Wicker for services at Bethlehem (W) and Antioch (W).

Chapel Hill church requested an appropriation of \$500.00 to aid them in their work there this year. While we realize the reasonableness of this request and the importance of the work, we regret exceedingly the inability of the Board to grant the request.

J. A. Dickey was elected Executive Secretary to this Board with no compensation except actual expenses. He is to secure pledges and receive payments of pledges to C. M. A.

The Board decided to undertake to supply the pastorless churches of Conference with pastors the coming year, and J. O. Atkinson was appointed to carry out the will of the Board in this matter, he to confer with the Executive Committee from time to time.

Report on Chautauqua was made, a special order following report, and address on Temperance.

The following Memorial from the North Carolina Conference was read and adopted:

A MEMORIAL

From the North Carolina Conference to the Southern Christian Convention:

In 1919 the North Carolina and Virginia, the Eastern North Carolina and the Western North Carolina Christian Conference, with the permission of the Southern Christian Convention, merged into The North Carolina Christian Conference, duly incorporated under the laws of North Carolina.

From the first there was dissatisfaction with the merger. Some objected because of the name, others because of the size of the united body, and others for still other reasons.

Accordingly at its 1921 session the North Carolina Conference authorized its Executive Committee to take a referendum vote on three questions, namely for one, two or three conferences in its present bounds. The enabling resolution is fully set forth on page 104 of the 1922 Christian Annual and need not be recited here.

This vote was taken and resulted as follows:

For one Conference (14 churches).....	40 votes
For two Conferences (11 churches).....	28 votes
For three Conferences (60 churches).....	141 votes
Not voting (33 churches).....	72 votes
Total, 118 churches	279 votes

We were further authorized to take proper action to make the referendum vote effective. Since this Convention has the sole right to fix Conference boundaries, we report these facts to you and seek your permission to restore the three former Conferences in North Carolina to their original boundaries.

We suggest that you appoint a special committee to consider how this may most equitably be done and to report their recommendations at this session.

Report of Committee on Super-Annuation read and adopted as follows:

In keeping with the vote of this Body at its last regular session your committee met in Raleigh, N. C., on December 9th, 1920, and organized by electing J. O. Atkinson, Chairman; W. M. Jay, Secretary; K. B. Johnson, Treasurer. The Board voted to ask all Conferences of the Convention to raise a sum equal to 5 cents per church member or its equivalent annually as a Super-annuation fund, provided no Conference be asked to raise less than \$100.00. This request was presented to the Conferences in their 1921 session and those not already doing so voted to accede to this request. Suitable applications were prepared for applicants to fill out when desiring to become beneficiaries of this fund. These blanks were sent to prospective beneficiaries so far as the Board had been able to find out regarding same.

We endeavored in our appropriations to follow as far as we could the regulations laid down in the Minutes of this Body at its session two years ago with the following result:

Fund is paid semi-annually on the 1st of January and July. Secretary of Board notifies President of S. C. C., who issues vouchers on Convention Treasurer in favor of beneficiaries.

A second meeting was held at Raleigh, N. C., January 25, 1922, and funds voted as stated above. Board voted to memorialize Convention to consolidate funds for Super-annuation so that they may be disbursed and paid out by the Board.

These funds are now held in part by the Treasurer of the Board of the Super-annuation, the Treasurer of the S. C. C., and the Treasurer of the Men and Millions Fund. At the first meeting of the Board it was voted to ask the Conferences to turn over their Super-annuation funds to the Treasurer of the Board. Some Conferences did and some turned theirs over to the Treasurer of the Convention. Hence the confused division of the sources of this fund.

The Convention should rejoice that the day has come with us when those who have given their best strength and efforts for their church in their declining years or years of dependency can feel that they are not forgotten and are to some extent at least appreciated. Reports from various sources indicate that the churches everywhere highly approve of the efforts being made to consolidate our funds and thus care for all the Convention's beneficiaries with equal favor, devotion and concern for each.

The report of the Committee on *Temperance* was read by Rev. J. W. Holt, Chairman, and on motion adopted, after discussion as follows:

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

Temperance, as applied to good things, means moderation, as applied to evil things, it means prohibition. In the light of this statement the Bible which is a prohibition book, and the Church, which is built upon this book, should stand solidly behind the prohibition of the liquor traffic and other evils. The Church should present a solid front against all forms of evil.

Since the last session of the Convention national prohibition of the liquor traffic has withstood the attacks of its enemies and today is more strongly

intrenched in the nation than ever before. More efficient law enforcement is necessary in order to gain the full benefits of prohibition and we advise all our people to aid in enforcing the laws against the liquor traffic.

Sabbath desecration is a growing evil and our people should become aroused in regard to it. Parents should use their divinely given authority to restrain their young people from such desecration of the Holy Sabbath day.

Cartoons in the public press and films in the moving picture shows, should be rigidly censored to prevent their suggesting unwholesome, impure and immoral thoughts and acts to both old and young people.

Modern styles in dress is hurtful to both the wearer and the observer. We favor text books on the nature and effects of alcohol for our public schools. We deplore the increase of juvenile parentage and the disregard of marriage vows. The Church should lead in moral and social reforms and not follow the ways of the world.

REPORT OF THE WOMEN'S BOARD 1922 ✓

The Women's Missionary Convention held its most largely attended session in the Methodist Church this morning and afternoon, more than two hundred women attending each session. The reports of the officers of the Convention and Conference Woman's Boards revealed an encouraging and wholesome progress, despite the much advertised depression of things financial and spiritual.

Following the custom of our reports from the beginning of our work ten years ago, I will give you by biennial periods the records of our financial growth:

pledges. The Committee has endeavored to respect this decision of the Convention and to carry on only such propaganda as seemed essential to keeping alive the spirit and purpose of the Movement. The Committee has had meetings from time to time to hear reports from the Executive Secretary and to discuss such matters as seemed to pertain to the maintenance and progress of the Movement. The work of the Committee has been divided into constituent parts and shows the following results.

ORGANIZATION

President W. A. Harper has continued his work as Secretary of organization and has sent out several circular letters calculated to stimulate activity and to keep the organization in the local churches and conferences intact as well as in the regional districts. Plans have been adopted to ask conferences in session as such in case there are vacancies to qualify successors.

In addition to this when Mr. J. A. Dickey was in the field as the representative of the Campaign Committee this office undertook to direct his work, receiving detailed reports from him and filing the same with the secretary of the committee.

He has answered numbers of letters from interested individuals, copies of which are on file in his office.

He attended the meetings of the chief leaders of the movement in the Eastern Virginia Conference, and also in the North Carolina Conference. This past fall, at the suggestion of these two Conferences, the Continuation Campaign Text Book was printed with the assistance and approval of the other secretaries of the Campaign Committee.

CONSTITUENT'S ELEMENTS OF THE MOVEMENT

Early in the present year the Campaign Committee realized the necessity of some propaganda in the interest of the constituent elements, or integral parts of the Movement, namely, Stewardship, Life Dedication and Life Recruits. Accordingly, the Committee asked its Chairman, J. O. Atkinson, to conduct a four months' campaign of Stewardship, and the Secretary of Organization, Dr. W. A. Harper, to conduct a four months' campaign for life dedication or increase in church membership. The Stewardship campaign was to cover the period January-April inclusive, life dedication, May-August, inclusive. The period September-December inclusive is contemplated as a time for seeking to win life recruits.

Only the first period has elapsed. During this period the Secretary of Stewardship secured, for the most part already printed, but in some instances by having printed the best literature he could on the subject of Stewardship and Tithing. This was distributed to the best advantage possible among the membership of the churches. In all there were sent out about 15,000 pieces of this literature to Pastors, Captains, Women Leaders and others requesting it. All pastors were invited to preach sermons on Stewardship and Tithing and to take such advantage as they deemed best of using the literature and other agencies to increase the number of tithers in the church. Tithing pledge cards were also sent out to all pastors. Owing to the fact that many pastors had on hand plans and programs for Easter and other services they have not yet carried out in their congregations their plans for increasing the number of tithers, but purpose doing so at an early date. Some have on now the Campaign for tithers and from some churches the returns are coming in with a gratifying increase in the number of those who have signed the pledge to tithe. It is too early yet to give any definite number or estimate of the increase secured. The interest in tithing we know has been greatly stimulated and will result in permanent good.

The campaign for life dedication or increase in membership, it to begin at once, if this Convention approves, and that is to be followed by the campaign for life recruits later.

PRESENT STATUS

Two years ago we were just out of the field flushed with victory, but worn with the conflict. We were advised that now the people should be let alone. There had been enough agitation, organization and irritation. The voice of the Convention was heeded. There has been a period of comparative quiet and ease from agitation. And yet the Committee feels as it did two years ago that the movement has really just begun. The efforts put forth, time and money spent, and results achieved in that campaign are all too valuable to let go longer and further. The pledges that were given should be collected; the increase in membership so well begun should be continued and the life recruits enlisted should be cultivated and efforts put forth to secure others. The Committee feels that the Convention is under moral obligations to all its constituents to prosecute the work further and thus reap the fruits of labor so faithfully done. To this end we recommend, that the Mission Board of the Southern Christian Convention be authorized to prosecute the work and plan for the Movement's perpetuation and that the Board of Religious Education be requested to co-operate to such an extent as may be requested by the Mission Board. The said Mission Board is hereby authorized to employ such field and office force as may be necessary. All salaries and expenses connected with Men and Millions Campaign to be paid out of receipts from this source before division to different Boards is made.

That all general officers of the Church and its institutions place themselves, as far as possible, at the disposal of the Board of Directors, and that said Board do all in its power to stimulate interest in the movement and thus not only reap what has been sown, but sow and cultivate for other and better harvests.

He has met regularly with the Campaign Committee and has cheerfully performed every duty that has been asked of him to the best of his ability.

He has sent collection envelopes to those applying for them as well as record books and notification slips, and written articles from time to time for the "Christian Sun."

In this way he has kept the organization intact, and has thus maintained the unity of the movement.

EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

The Executive Secretary has kept the accounts with Captains and local collectors in the churches and has been instant at all times in his endeavor to collect funds as rapidly as possible and turn same into the hands of the Treasurer. He was aided in the field in this work by Field Agent J. A. Dickey several months of last year. Brother Dickey visited many Captains and Treasurers in the churches in the endeavor to stimulate collections and sustain interest in the work. The Executive Secretary presents the following as of April 30th, 1922:

Estimating that seven-twentieths of the total subscribed for the five years is now due, this amount if collected would be \$186,869.09. Of this the above shows collected \$62,785.00 leaving a balance now due on pledges \$124,084.09. That is, there has been collected to date a fraction over 33 1-3 per cent. of amount pledged and now due. In the face of the sore business depression through which we have passed, we still feel hopeful and have the faith to believe our people will make good their pledges if the matter is properly kept before them.

The Committee met on January 29, 1921, to consider this request and after due consideration unanimously voted that the same be granted, and accounts be approved by D. R. Fonville, Chairman of the Board of Publication and C. D. Johnson, Executive Secretary.

The two years included in this report have been filled with many great blessings. The kind Master has so blessed us that the hearts of His people have been touched, and we have been permitted to accomplish a great deal in the Orphanage work.

The Children's Home that we mentioned to you in our last report has been built at a cost of thirty-two thousand eight hundred and twenty dollars and four cents (\$32,820.04) including water, lights, sewerage, heating plant and furnishings.

This is a splendid structure of brick, a two-story building with four large basement rooms with cement floors. This building contains twenty rooms besides the basement rooms and will accommodate seventy-five children if we see fit to put that many in it. We have at present thirty-two little tots in it.

All the four buildings have been recovered during the last two years and our barn was not adequate to take care of the feed and give room for the horses and cattle so we cut enough lumber out of our own pine forest to make all the framing and have built and equipped a new modern barn on the Lowder plan, 50 feet long by 36 feet wide at a cost of one thousand three hundred and twenty dollars and nine cents (\$1,320.09). This barn is a great asset to the farm department in housing the stock and in giving plenty of room to store feed raised on the Orphanage farm.

We are grateful for the loyal support of the entire brotherhood during the two years just past and feel that by having the support we have had, that much has been accomplished in our work.

We are now taking care of eighty-five children. We hope to get the income up to the point that will permit us to reach our goal of one hundred in the near future.

People outside of our denomination have been very kind to us, and we wish to mention to this Convention the endowment fund given by Mr. Lawrence S. Holt, Sr., formerly of Burlington, N. C., now Washington, D. C., which brings into our Treasury one hundred dollars (\$100.00) per month. We want to mention the three thousand dollar (\$3,000.00) contribution he gave us on the new building, the largest single contribution we received.

We also mention the splendid contribution of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) given by Mr. Jas. N. Williamson, formerly of Burlington, now

of De Land, Fla., which was given especially for the heating of the building.

We mention these three contributions to show you that people on the outside of our denomination are also interested in our work, which ought to stimulate us to greater efforts.

We are grateful to the fertilizer manufacturers for furnishing a large part of the fertilizer free of charge, that we have used on the farm during the past two years. We are also grateful to the cotton mills in Alamance County and other counties in North Carolina for the large amount of cloth they give each year as Thanksgiving offerings.

We are grateful to the good women for the many nice quilts, blankets, sheets, pillows and pillow cases; also for the clothing which they send to us from time to time. It is a great help in the work and we are profoundly grateful.

We are happy to present to this Convention, in addition to the original Christian Orphanage building, another splendid new building with all modern conveniences valued at more than \$32,000.00 with thirty-three little orphan children within its walls with room for forty or fifty more.

We are glad to say to you that you have in the Christian Orphanage plant including lands, buildings, farm and dairy equipment a plant valued at \$100,000.00 with eighty-three little orphan boys and girls to love you and appreciate what you do for them that they may have an equal opportunity in life with other boys and girls. We are also glad to say to you that this Institution has no debt but we have to our credit in cash, due bills, and Liberty Bonds the amount of \$4,355.26.

The Secretary was instructed to write a letter of thanks to Mr. Lawrence S. Holt, Sr., Washington, D. C., and to Mr. James N. Williamson, De Land, Florida, for their generous contributions to the Orphanage.

Rev. H. P. Clark, Pastor of the Main Street M. E. Church, South, Suffolk, Va., was introduced to the Convention.

Rev. S. A. Howell, President of the Afro Christian Convention, and a delegation from the Convention were introduced, and after brief remarks rendered some of the inspiring old songs, peculiarly dear to the colored people of the South.

The report of the Committee on the location of the Junior College was submitted, and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON JUNIOR COLLEGE

For quite a number of years it has been the desire and the hope of our people of the Christian Church in Georgia and Alabama that a school for the training of the young men and women in that section of our work would some day be established and functioning in their midst. This hope has from time to time seemed to vanish and then would again appear, until at last some definite action has been taken and the school so much desired and needed is, we trust, on the way.

Our Men and Millions Forward Movement had as one of its objectives the meeting of this need in our work of the far South with the building of an educational institution somewhere in that section. This was a part of our stated program, and funds were subscribed with that in view.

In keeping with this idea, the 1920 session of this Convention, in body assembled at Raleigh, N. C., elected a Board of Trustees, and also a Committee on Location, the latter being charged with the responsibility of securing a site, procuring a charter, deciding the grade of work to be done,

and the selection of a name for the proposed school. (The last named duty of the Committee was authorized by the last session of this body.)

The Committee on Location has gone about the work assigned since the above named session of the Convention, and at this time it is a pleasure to report the progress that has thus far been made.

A number of bids for the school were received, all of which were duly considered, the award of the location finally going to the town of Wadley, Ala. Among the bids submitted to your Committee that of Wadley seemed the most inviting, for the reason that the town is situated in the center of a group of substantial rural churches from which student support may, with a large degree of certainty, be expected; and for the further reason that the financial concessions proposed were better than from any other community bidding for the school. The financial inducements proposed included the offer of an ample site, with a splendid cash donation besides. This bid having been accepted, the Committee has in hand a warranty deed to a tract of land just north of the town of Wadley, this tract consisting of 44.75 acres, and a subscription list for cash totaling \$22,262.50. It should be said that the site donated is a gift from Mr. John M. Hodge, Cashier of the Bank of Wadley, and a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

As to grade of work to be done, we wish to report that it is our decision that the school shall have, for the first few years, a six years' course of study, covering four years of accredited high school work and the first two years of a standard college course.

We have prepared a charter for the school, this charter requiring that this Convention elect a new Board of Trustees, or the re-election of the Board chosen two years ago. The law of the State of Alabama, in which the school is located, requires that the charter be certified to by the Trustees within thirty days after their election, and when the charter has been so certified and recorded in Randolph County, Alabama, the county in which the school is located, the Board of Trustees will then be duly empowered to effect an organization within themselves and to proceed with their work.

The name chosen for the proposed institution is Bethlehem College, Wadley, Ala. The Committee is informed by the Secretary of the Alabama Christian Conference that this name has met with general approval and satisfaction.

The outlook for this institution is one of splendid promise, provided the project elicits and enlists the hearty co-operation of our people generally. The town of Wadley is solidly interested in the school and expects it to be a success, having pledged herself to labor zealously and unitedly to that end. Our Conferences in Georgia and Alabama are looking forward with keen anticipation to the beginning of this enterprise, and stand ready to throw themselves whole-heartedly into the endeavor to make it a success. The need is there and the opportunity waits at our door. We cannot afford to fail, and, God helping us, we shall go forward to success in this undertaking.

We recommend that the title to the site for the college, which is now in the Southern Christian Convention, be conveyed to the Board of Trustees of Bethlehem College, when said Board has been duly and legally incorporated.

As information, we should like to say that Dickert, Abanda, and Roanoke, Alabama, and Columbus, Americus, and Ambrose, Georgia, were very much interested in securing the location of the school, some of these places going far enough to make splendid offers.

The report of the Board of Publications was read by Mr. D. R. Fonville, Chairman, and considered by items.

Report of Rev. C. B. Riddle, Editor, was submitted.

THURSDAY—AFTERNOON

Convention met and called to order at 2:30 o'clock. Devotional services led by Rev. P. T. Klapp.

Dr. L. E. Smith led in special prayer for the mother of Sam Davis, the blind pianist.

The Secretary was instructed to send a telegram of sympathy to Mr. Sam Davis.

Consideration of the report of the Board of Publications was resumed, and after prolonged discussion the report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF BOARD OF PUBLICATION

Not in the history of our publishing interest in the South has the Board faced such problems as it has during the last biennium. During this period our Editor and Publishing Agent has kept each member of the Board fully informed as to existing conditions. The Board has also met in several sessions and done its best to reach some conclusion for the good of our cause as represented through the printed page, and especially that of "The Christian Sun."

"The Christian Sun" has sustained a total deficit of \$14,113.87 during the bi-ennium, and we realize that only by strictest economy have we been able to keep the deficit as low as it is. Our Editor has provided his own office and book store free of any rental charge to the Convention. The last Convention voted to allow him \$1,000.00 per year for office help, but only \$1,420 has been expended in this way, the Editor choosing of his own volition to meet this expense in face of the continued deficit.

The Board has investigated the cost of printing "The Sun" and finds that we have been given a fair and reasonable price—a price that we have been unable to duplicate in workmanship for the same money.

Your Board has also looked into the future cost of maintaining "The Sun" and is convinced that a deficit for the next bi-ennium will be equal to that of the last two years. A deficit in maintaining "The Sun" is a duplicate situation with practically every Church paper. Our College, our Orphanage and other institutions have to be endowed in order to meet their running expenses. These conditions have been since their beginning, and the public expects it as a matter of business and accepts it without question. But the Church paper situation is different. The public has been taught to think that a publication should pay its own way. Labor has asserted herself, working conditions have been completely changed, to stay changed. The price of printing materials are no longer cheap, as they once were; and so these things bring an entirely new day to the publishing industry. We, therefore, after close study and prayerful consideration, go on record

as believing that the only thing that can be done is to operate at the least expense, keeping in mind the character, efficiency, and service of "The Christian Sun" and set ourselves to the task of providing the deficit that must come, if "The Sun" is maintained.

Your Board, therefore, clearly sees that within the next five years that the total deficit on "The Christian Sun" will amount to around twenty-five or thirty thousand dollars, unless some provision is made to invest the amount which we must spend for deficit, with a view of making it realize an income to offset the loss.

Your Committee is conscious of the fact that with a continued deficit on "The Christian Sun" some provisions must be made for securing the money with which to meet this deficit. We further realize that even if the Men and Millions Forward Movement continues its present relations with "The Sun" that is, paying the deficit before the distribution of the funds, that the time will soon come when this source of revenue will be cut off.

During the first part of this year our Editor and Publishing Agent enlarged the book business and the records show that there is considerable promise to this part of the work. We encourage this department.

We make the following recommendations :

(1) That if "The Sun" is maintained, the price be reduced from \$2.50 to \$2.00 per year effective June 1, 1922.

(2) That the Board of Publication borrow from some Board of the Church the sum of one thousand dollars to be used as a capital to enlarge the Publishing Agent business.

(3) That the Christian Annual be officially recognized as the property of the Southern Christian Convention, and that the Convention assume all responsibility for its publication. And that the deficit of \$698.98 sustained in the publication of the 1921 Annual be paid by the Convention.

(4) That in future editions of "The Christian Annual" the Editor be authorized to publish only reports and actual necessary happenings, omitting all preliminaries and unessential detail.

(5) That the Board of Publication be incorporated under the laws of the State of North Carolina as a department of the Southern Christian Convention.

(6) That we go on record as favoring a better grade of literature for the Sunday Schools, and that the Board of Religious Education be asked to take up the matter with the Sunday School Committee, of the American Christian Convention, looking toward a more creditable literature for our Sunday Schools.

(7) That the Board of Publications be authorized to make all contracts for printing periodicals and publishing literature to be issued under the authority of the Convention.

Adjourned until evening session.

TO THE BOARD OF PUBLICATIONS OF THE SOUTHERN CHRISTIAN CONVENTION:
The Central Publishing Co., Inc., of Richmond, Va., makes the following proposal:

P. J. Kernodle will serve as Managing Editor for the "Christian Sun," and the Central Publishing Company will print, mail and post an average weekly issue of four thousand (4,000) copies of the "Christian Sun" of 16 pages, size 11 x 14 inches trimmed, set in 10 point type, the advertising therein not to exceed an average of six pages per week, same to be printed upon 58 pound machine book white paper.

PROVIDED, and upon condition, that the said Company shall have and receive as and for full payment for its services and all expenses the subscriptions to the said paper and all amounts received from advertisements appearing therein and an additional bonus of three thousand (\$3,000.00) Dollars per year to be paid in monthly installments, which said \$3,000.00 shall be supplied by the Southern Christian Convention.

(2) It is further understood and agreed that the only other expense to be borne by the said Convention is the cost of editing the said "Christian Sun."

(3) It is agreed that this contract shall be and remain in force for a period of two years from and after July 1st, 1922, unless said contract shall be sooner terminated by the mutual consent of the Central Publishing Company, Inc., and the Board of Publications of the Southern Christian Convention.

Report of the Mission Board was submitted and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF MISSION BOARD

There is no greater cause for gratitude and rejoicing in our Convention than the awakening interest in missions. Our beloved and faithful pastors are emphasizing the missionary teaching of the Bible as never before, and are holding up to their congregations, in sermon and in service, the Bible as a missionary book. Our Sunday School superintendents and teachers are realizing that they are real factors in world wide evangelization, and our Sunday Schools are fast becoming missionary classes and organizations. Our women are organizing missionary societies in every church, and our young people are forming societies for missionary study and activity. Men and women amongst us who five years ago were indifferent to missions, and gave a scant dollar a year to missions, are deeply concerned now in every missionary movement and are liberal contributors to missions. We have in the constituency of this Convention one church that now sends out and supports three missionaries. We have one Sunday School which by its free will offering in the regular collection of once per month, supports a foreign missionary in Japan at a salary of \$1,000.00 per year, and we have a rural school at which there is preaching once per month, that has voted to build a church of its own type and kind in some foreign field, and is monthly collecting a substantial sum for this purpose. Numbers of our schools are not only giving one offering a month to missions, but, that which is equally if not more vital, have a missionary superintendent or lecturer to bring before the school each Sunday, or at least once per month some missionary message of information and inspiration. There is a constant and growing demand for missionary literature, missionary lectures, missionary sermons and missionary propaganda. Your Board cannot help feeling grateful beyond words at this unmistakable evidence of the genuine and permanent missionary awakening amongst us. But what has been done is only an earnest of what may be done, and makes a beginning from which we should press on to ever increasing duties and achievements. What we are doing for missions neither exhausts our efforts nor impoverishes our resources; it but stimulates our endeavor and increases our resources. We are learning that the missionary idea is not something apart from, attached to, or an amendment of the gospel's original constitution; but it is the vital element in the gospel itself. It is a part of the supreme law of the spiritual land. "I bring you good tidings of great joy which shall be to all the people." The very announcement of our Savior's coming is in the missionary key, and the messenger straight from the courts of the King, could not be mistaken in the nature of the message. Every true, vital and full message of the Gospel must be missionary. God so intended from the beginning.

On the 1st of September, 1917, your Board began missionary activities through its field secretary. The financial objective for the first five years following was to secure pledges in the sum of \$100,000.00, to be paid in five annual installments and to increase missionary offerings through the regular Conference and other channels. Pledges were secured to a total of \$125,000.00 and there is a balance to be collected on these pledges of \$40,232.00. Estimating four-fifths of the five years period as now past, there is now due on these pledges and unpaid \$15,232.00. The Secretary has collected and sent into the President of the Convention since September

1, 1917, \$84,632.44. Instead of decreasing, the contributions to missions through the regular channels have increased nearly 100 per cent. during this period of individual initiative and contributions.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

In order that there might be the closest co-operation and absolute harmony between this Board and the Foreign Mission Board of the American Christian Convention the two Boards met at Dayton, Ohio, February 1, 1921, and the following was unanimously adopted as the working basis of the two Boards:

"It is mutually agreed by the A. C. C. Board and the S. C. C. Board that 50 per cent. of all foreign mission funds contributed by the S. C. C. shall go into a work in China, this amount to be supplemented by a 20 per cent. increase from the A. C. C. Board for a period of five years. This five-year period to begin as soon as the S. C. C. Board shall have paid into the treasury of the A. C. C., Board funds sufficient to build a night school and kindergarden building in Japan at a cost of \$12,000.00 and finish the mission home in Japan at a cost of \$9,000.00 in addition to the amount already on hand for the purpose. The above conditions being met the S. C. C. Board agrees to put 50 per cent. of its funds into the general fund for foreign missions.

If this agreement is entered into the S. C. C. Board will undertake to raise twenty-five thousand dollars a year (\$25,000.00) as a minimum for the next five years."

The \$21,000.00 called for in this agreement from this Board for the Missionary Home and the Kindergarten and Night School has all been paid and we are now working to further the other parts of the program of agreement and co-operation.

This agreement was reached after thorough discussion of the greatly increased budget which our A. C. C. Board had in contemplation and which budget was adopted following the adoption of the above plan of co-operation. This budget for 1921 was for Japan, including regular and specials \$49,905.00. For Porto Rico, \$20,164.00 including specials and extension work. For union work, \$1,870.99. For administration, \$5,000.00 making a total budget for the year of \$76,870.99. This increased budget means increased activities along all lines both in the foreign field and at the home base. We are most happy that a plan of co-ordination has been worked out, and a responsibility laid upon this Board by the Convention has been so agreeably met and discharged.

MEN AND MILLIONS

This Board has been deeply interested in the Men and Millions Movement from its incipiency and has given its full support to the Movement as best it could. It has used its Secretary to further the ends of that Movement at all times and stands ready to aid in every legitimate way the undertakings and plans of the Campaign Committee or Directors of the Movement.

EVANGELISM

Two years ago we reported to the Convention our activities in the field of evangelism, as we had been commissioned by this body to do. These endeavors were maintained through a regular evangelist until September 15, 1921. The department was maintained from the last session of this body until September 15, 1921, with a financial deficit of \$2,798.93. But through this department during the period there were reported 492 conversions, and 242 additions to the churches. We feel, therefore, that our endeavors and expenditures in this line were not in vain.

OUR MOUNTAIN WORK

Two years ago it was announced to the Convention that a mission work was contemplated to begin by us in the mountains of Virginia under the leadership of Miss Iola Hedgepeth. In November, 1920, it was decided to open a school in Carroll County, near Hillsville, Va., and Miss Hedgepeth, securing a very inadequate and dilapidated building, soon had some 80 pupils enrolled in day school and nearly that number in Sunday School. Last summer she was assisted by two teachers in the six weeks' summer school. During the summer it was decided to erect a house for day school and Sunday School purposes. A committee composed of President W. W. Staley, of this Convention; Miss Bessie I. Holt, Superintendent of Young Peoples Work, and J. O. Atkinson, Mission Secretary, went to Fancy Gap, Carroll County, Va., and made purchase of about 17 acres of land at a cost of \$491.00 as a site for our school and contemplated church buildings. One acre was donated by G. W. Edwards, making our holdings 18 acres. A modern, ample and comfortable house has been built at a cost of \$3,207.74, and has been occupied for some months by our teachers and school. During the past year Miss Hedgepeth has been ably assisted in her work of teaching by Miss Emily Midyett, Norfolk, Va., and supported by Christian Temple. This work has been and is exceedingly promising of results, and the people there now are demanding of us a preacher. This summer a preacher is to go for us and we are hopeful that permanent work of grace may be done in that region where education and the gospel are so much needed.

OTHER POINTS HELPED

In the Alabama Conference we are helping in erecting a church and supporting the pastor in North Alabama, where a new work was opened about eighteen months ago. Rev. J. W. Elder is the pastor in charge, and the new church now nearing completion is at Pisgah, Ala. A country church some miles distant in Culman County, is now nearly self supporting. The Northern Alabama field is very inviting and the work done there thus far seems to have yielded very satisfactory results. The Alabama Conference is of course co-operating in the Northern Alabama work and seems exceedingly grateful for the aid the Convention has been able to render.

In the Georgia and Alabama Conference we are helping support the work at Rose Hill, Columbus, Ga. Rev. R. F. Brown, Pastor. We have here a very attractive church building and parsonage in a residential section of the city. The church has had quite a struggle, as all churches seem to have in getting thoroughly established, but the present pastor is very hopeful and the Conference quite grateful for the aid rendered. We helped in the purchase of a lot at East LaGrange, Ga., the congregation there, newly organized, agreeing to build if we would assist in purchasing the lot.

In the Virginia Valley Conference we are aiding First Church, Winchester, Va., which is now practically out of debt and which we have reason to believe after another year will be self-supporting. We have a very promising work here in the very heart of the city and we feel that all the money the Board has spent here has been well invested. We assisted in the expense of locating Rev. R. P. Crumpler at Luray, Va.

In the North Carolina Conference we helped Reidsville until a year ago, when it finished its indebtedness, but which is now self-supporting and no longer requires assistance from us. We have appropriated \$250.00 to Mebane and have pledged \$500.00 more provided plans and specifications of the building promised there meets the approval of the Board, and provided further, the building does not cost less than \$2,500.00. We are assisting the work at Franklinton, N. C., which has temporary quarters in the first floor, or cellar, of a building now begun. Rev. D. A. Long, D.D., is the pastor this year and is located at Franklinton. We are assisting in the work at

Chapel Hill, N. C., in partial support of the pastor while the congregation is seeking to finish liquidating the indebtedness on their church and parsonage.

In the Eastern Virginia Conference we are helping Richmond in supplying a pastor and assisting in the purchase price of their lot and the building which they propose to begin in September. In Norfolk we are assisting what was formerly Third Church, but now known as Christian Temple. So far this congregation has worshiped and is still occupying a mere shack of a plank building. A membership of about 900 has been gathered, and last week began excavating for their new building which is to cost \$200,000. Our Board has materially aided in this work from its very beginning and still feels that no more promising work for returns has ever been undertaken by the Board. We are also aiding in the partial support of a pastor at Prentiss Place, Portsmouth, and in a small way assisting First Church at Portsmouth in paying off a debt of many years standing.

RECOMMENDATIONS

We recommend:

1st. That the work of our Men and Millions Forward Movement be continued and that this Board lend every effort in justice to its other endeavors to help further the progress of the Movement.

2nd. In as much as the demands on this Board for funds are increasing far more rapidly than the funds for meeting these demands, and as we have outstanding pledges which call for increased income, and in as much as in many churches and among many of our people the Men and Millions Movement did not function, we urge the endeavor to secure individual pledges for missions from those who were not reached by or did not participate in the pledges of our Men and Millions Movement.

3rd. That in order to reach our young people with the missionary message not only will we have to form Young Peoples' Missionary Societies, but teach missions in the Sunday School. We urge, therefore, that every effort be made to get missions taught by some approved method to suit the local situation in every Sunday School of the churches of the Convention and that all our Sunday Schools give one offering per month to the Orphanage and one offering a month to missions.

4th. That inasmuch as our Women's Missionary Societies have proven such blessings to the churches in which they have been organized, that we urge all our pastors to seek the co-operation of the Woman's Board and the Mission Secretary to organize a Woman's and a Young People's Society in each church.

5th. We heartily commend the Christian Missionary published at Dayton, Ohio, to our Missionary Societies and to individuals as a magazine worthy of our heartiest support and a careful reading.

6th. In order to maintain the closest co-operation between this Body and the A. C. C. Board, (Home Mission Department), we approve the appropriation of 10 per cent. of our Convention Mission Fund to the A. C. C. Board annually, and that all applications for help from the A. C. C. Board be passed upon by the Board of this Convention.

7th. That the goal of this Convention for the next two years be 10 per cent. increase in church membership per year, and that our pastors be urged to keep this goal in mind in their several churches, and that we unite our petition to our Heavenly Father that this goal be achieved to the advancement of his Kingdom.

8th. That we continue the work of evangelism as we were instructed to do by the last session of this Body as soon as the Board shall deem advisable, has the means in hand, and the person or persons in sight to prosecute the work.

9th. We ask this Convention to consider today the wisdom of calling the Convention in extraordinary session one year hence to handle such

matters as may come before it looking to the progress of our work and that proper steps be taken looking to making our sessions annual instead of bi-ennial.

10th. We reiterate our recommendation of two years ago that \$1,200.00 should be a minimum salary for single ministers and \$1,500.00 for married ministers.

The last report showed the work of the office financially through August, 1919, total collected of \$34,215.38. Continuing as per reports made and audited we have received through the Executive Secretary and turned over to the Treasurer of the Convention the following amounts by months:

Report of the Board of Education submitted and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

THE EDUCATIONAL SITUATION

Rapid changes have occurred in the educational world the past two years. The war gave a great impetus to education and the government through its Vocational Board has initiated innovations of far-reaching consequence, should they succeed. From the standpoint of the curriculum, the emphasis has been upon the sciences, with corresponding decrease in the numbers of students studying the ancient languages. Experiments are being tried too with reference to mental measurements as an aid to determine fitness to enter college and for vocational guidance.

But perhaps the most significant aim has been the erection of standards for colleges. President Wilson, by executive order in 1913, forbade the Bureau of Education to standardize the colleges. However, this bureau is now busy collecting and circulating lists of "Standard Colleges" made out by voluntary educational associations having no legal warrant whatsoever for such procedure, thus accomplishing by indirection what it has been specifically ordered not to do. We called the bureau's attention to this violation of their orders. We also wrote Senator F. M. Simmons. He has the issue now in hand. His view is the same as we expressed, that the bureau is endeavoring to do by indirection what it was ordered not to do directly.

The stronger colleges in wealth and numbers are pushing hard to drive the poorer schools and the small colleges from the field or to reduce them to the status of Junior Colleges. Two years ago we expressed our resentment that standardizing agencies should rate colleges solely by their physical assets. We reiterate that resentment now. It is our conviction, and history sustains us, that small colleges are the effective seminaries of Christian character and of true greatness. It is true of colleges, as of men, that the middle class constitute the nation's finest asset and determine her future.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

There is also a growing differentiation of function between denominational colleges and all other types of educational institutions of higher learning, particularly the tax supported institutions. The denominational colleges are to produce citizens too, but they are to produce Christians primarily, men and women not only motivated in terms of Christian idealism, but definitely trained and experienced in methods and principles of promoting the Kingdom's work. So these colleges are strengthening their Biblical Departments and adding Departments of Religious Education. Our own college was among the first to sense this new expectation of the churches. Bible is now required of all Freshmen and Sophomores one hour a week and elective to all Juniors and Seniors. We have a four-year course in Religious Education, treating such themes as the history and principles of religious education, the Christian home, the local church, week-day religious instructions, the auxiliary organizations of the church, and kindred themes. This department aims to accomplish two things—to prepare those who pursue its work for four years to be directors of Religious Education in local churches and to train those who take even a single one of its courses to appreciate the importance of investing their leisure hours in service to the church.

THE CHURCH'S SYSTEM OF EDUCATION

This Board in January, 1921, issued its now famous poster on "The Church's System of Education." The announced intent of this poster was to demonstrate to the eye the articulate relationship between the Sunday Schools of the denomination and Elon. Elon by it is defined as the Sunday Schools of the Southern Christian Convention engaged in the work of higher education. Prominent educators of the country to whom this system was submitted for criticism have declared it to be unique and sorely needed in all the denominations. There can be no doubt that the Sunday Schools of our church are the normal source of supply for students in our college. The church's system of education insists that every Sunday School should regard itself as a local recruiting station for our college and that the college in turn should regard itself as heading up the whole educational work of the church. This poster went forth in February, 1921. The consequence was that we had 32 schools that reached their quota of one Freshman in Elon for every one hundred of enrollment or fraction thereof this year and 34 others are represented in the college this year. For the first time in many years more than half the students come from our own homes.

One other step is necessary to make this co-ordination and correlation

of our college and Sunday Schools complete—a course of study for students in our Sunday Schools of high school age, issued by our college, supplied to the schools, and accredited toward entrance to college. The International Sunday School Council of Religious Education in June is expected to issue such a course. If it should we will edit it, giving it the *Elon and Christian* setting, and send it forth to serve the cause of Christ in our midst. If not, we purpose to construct our own course along the following four lines, giving a year to the consideration of each theme:

- Principles of the Christian Life.
- The Bible and Social Living.
- The World a Field for Christian Service.
- Preparation for Lives of Christian Service.

Those who are acquainted with the curriculum materials now in existence will recognize that other denominations have courses of study similar to these proposals. They do not, however, serve in their published form to unite the local schools and the college. Our system will be unique in that respect. The possibilities that inherit in this statesman-like movement at co-ordination and conservation loom large with prophecy for the progress of our church. This system practiced faithfully for a generation will give us a personnel in leadership trained for Kingdom promotion second to none.

PREPARATORY DEPARTMENT ELIMINATED

The Board of Trustees have eliminated the preparatory department. This step has resulted in a temporary decrease in enrollment. In a few years we ought to recover. There is no doubt but that it was a wise decision. However helpful this department was in the years passed, there is no necessity now for colleges to maintain preparatory departments.

JUNIOR COLLEGE IN FAR SOUTH

There is no need that we should speak in detail with reference to Bethlehem College which our church is to found for the Georgia and Alabama brethren. A special committee will report on it. Suffice it to say that its founding will supply a long felt need in our church as we rejoice in it.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION FUND

The Convention at its last session voted to merge the ministerial educational funds of the various conferences into one and to make the Treasurer of *Elon College*, since he is under bond, the custodian of these funds, loans to be made by him upon the order of this Board; request for the same being first approved by the respective conference committees of education. The custodian makes the following report to us, which we incorporate herewith:

REPORT OF CUSTODIAN, MINISTERIAL FUND, SOUTHERN CHRISTIAN CONVENTION

*To the Chairman Board of Education,
Southern Christian Convention:*

As custodian of the funds of the Board of Education of the Southern Christian Convention, I have the honor to make the following report:

There have been turned into my hands by the Treasurers of the different Conferences notes amounting to \$4,467.35; certificates of deposit, *Alamance Bank & Trust Co.*, and *Elon Banking & Trust Co.*, \$1,027.89; balance in bank on checking account, \$38.67; total, \$5,533.91.

REPORT OF AUDITING COMMITTEE

We, the Auditing Committee, have examined the books of Dr. T. C. Amick, Custodian of Ministerial Funds, and find them correct, showing a balance in bank of \$38.67, and total funds amounting to \$5,533.91.

DEPARTMENT OF THEOLOGY

1. We have given very careful consideration to the matter of undertaking to institute at Elon College a Department of Theology, which will really approach in efficiency the course of study offered in the standard theological seminaries. We approve the idea, but are unable to decide whether the time is now ripe to raise the necessary funds. It could certainly not be undertaken with an outlay of less than \$100,000.00. We refer the matter to the Convention itself.

OTHER ITEMS

1. The increase in number of ministerial students attending Elon this year is most gratifying. This is directly attributed to the Men and Millions Forward Movement. The number of our young men studying in the Yale, Princeton and Chicago seminaries also encourages us to hope for larger growth in the days ahead.

2. There is no doubt that we should officially adopt a college month and annually celebrate it in all our churches. June seems to us to be the most promising month for this purpose, and we so recommend. We urge every church and pastor to co-operate with the college to make this month the occasion of great strengthening for the cause of education in the Convention.

3. The value of the Elon College Fund has been amply demonstrated through the years. With the founding of the Junior College for Georgia and Alabama, part of this fund should go to that school. We recommend that the name of the fund be changed to "Schools and Colleges Fund" and that the portion of it raised in Georgia and Alabama be paid to the school there, a note being given on the same basis as the note to "The Board of Trustees of Elon College."

4. We urge our people to pay promptly their pledges to the Standardization Fund. The college needs the income on this fund and desires that its friends meet their obligations so generously assumed on its behalf.

The indebtedness of the college incurred by increased cost of operation and needed improvements, full account of which was printed in the "Christian Sun" in November, 1921, will have to be cared for by a special fund for its liquidation at a later date. We hardly think it advisable to undertake to raise money for this purpose now.

In conclusion, we wish again to record our hearty approval of our college and of its splendid work. We bespeak for it increased support and the devoted loyalty of all who love the Christian church and are anxious for its growth and prosperity.

3. That we thank our Convention officers for their kind, efficient and impartial services.

The Report of the Board of Religious Education was submitted, and on motion, adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

In presenting this report to the Convention, your Board is aware of the fact that it is considering one of the gravest problems and dealing with one of the greatest perils confronting Christendom. We are looking at the future church and wondering what will be the effect of this great mass of untaught young people. Over 50 per cent. of our young people out of the Sunday School fifty years ago would not have meant what it does today. Then there was the family prayer and religious teaching in the home. We do not have that now and when we are told that there are 27,000,000 out of our Sunday Schools, 4,500,000 in the States represented in this Convention, it means that there are practically that many without religious instruction. To meet this need and to remedy this condition is the task imposed upon your Board by the Convention, and with limited means and still more limited experience, we have accepted the responsibility and through the hearty co-operation of the brotherhood, we feel that an encouraging beginning has been made in the great work before us.

FIELD SECRETARY ELECTED

Following the recommendation of the last Convention, the Board elected a Field Secretary. Miss Lucy M. Eldredge was called to this position and assumed her duties July 8, 1921. The gratifying results obtained have proven the wisdom of the Board in her selection. The following is a summary of her work for the nine and three-quarter months from July 8th to May 1st:

REPORT OF FIELD SECRETARY

- (1) Notes have been furnished weekly for the "Christian Sun."
- (2) A bureau of information has been maintained in which 94 inquiries have been answered by mail, 603 personal letters written, and 2,233 circular letters sent out, and 1,862 pieces of printed literature mailed out, in addition to literature distributed in the field on trips.
- (3) A tabulation of our Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies with the names and addresses of the officers and teachers has been made. We find that we have 206 Sunday Schools with a membership of 20,303, which is 74½ per cent. of our church membership. We also have 53 Christian Endeavor Societies with an approximate membership of 1,324.
- (4) A Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Convention has been organized in the Georgia and Alabama Conference.
- (5) Attended 10 Conferences and Conventions.
- (6) Visited 39 churches, 16 Sunday Schools, 7 Christian Endeavor Societies.
- (7) Assisted in organizing 11 Christian Endeavor Societies; 2 Sunday Schools, besides various departments in Sunday Schools.
- (8) Held 18 institutes and taught in the Seaside Chautauqua a class in Religious Education.
- (9) Traveled approximately 6,221 miles, and delivered 74 addresses.
- (10) The "Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Hand Book" was issued containing the proceedings and statistics of the various Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Conventions of the S. C. C. and copies were sent to every church in the Convention.

WORK PLANNED

In addition to the regular visitation to conferences, conventions and churches, we have planned the following activities for the coming year:

- (1) To stimulate a deeper interest in our Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Conventions. Only 19 Sunday School superintendents out of 206 attended our Conventions last year. It is our purpose to get in personal touch with these workers, through our Field Secretary and endeavor to interest them in the Conventions.
- (2) To hold one and two-day institutes on Sunday School and Christian Endeavor work throughout all our conferences.
- (3) To hold Daily Vacation Bible Schools in every Conference. Several churches are planning now for this work.
- (4) A six weeks contest in attendance, new members, offerings and departmental work between the *North Carolina and Alabama Conferences*, and the *Virginia and Georgia-Alabama Conferences*, the contest to begin May 7th, and close Children's Day, June 11th.

5. Missionary instruction and offering.
6. Temperance instruction.
7. Definite decision for Christ urged.
8. Workers' Conference, regularly held.
9. Full denominational requirements.
10. Full Sunday School Association requirements.

(4) That all Christian Endeavor Societies strive to reach the standard set by the Christian Endeavor Board of our church. The points are as follows :

1. Adoption of the Christian Endeavor Efficiency Chart.
2. 10 per cent. annual increase in membership.
3. 10 per cent. of income for Christian Endeavor work in Christian church.
4. Fifty cents per member annually for missions.
5. 50 per cent. average attendance at Christian Endeavor meeting.
6. 50 per cent. of Active Members Comrades of the Quiet Hour.
7. 25 per cent. of Active Members enrolled in Tenth Legion.
8. 25 per cent. of membership Christian Endeavor Experts.
9. Representative at denominational Christian Endeavor gathering.
10. Representative at State or District Christian Endeavor gathering.

(5) That our Conventions make special efforts to secure the attendance of all Sunday School and Christian Endeavor workers at the sessions of the Convention. This Board pledges itself to assist in these efforts.

(6) We recommend that the Seaside Chautauqua and School of Methods be continued under the name of Chautauqua and School of Methods of the Southern Christian Convention, that it be under the direction and control of the Board of Religious Education, with power to elect officers, arrange programs, and appoint times and places of the sessions.

(7) That the following amounts be apportioned the Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Conventions of this Convention for the support of the work of this Board, and we would further urge that each Convention make an effort to meet the apportionment :

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

Your Committee, knowing something of the powerful influence the reading of literature of any sort has in moulding the character, shaping the beliefs, and determining the conduct of those who read it, would urge our

people to read more religious literature, giving the Bible their greatest attention. We recommend to our people, especially, our religious publications, viz.: "The Christian Sun," "The Herald of Gospel Liberty," "The Christian Missionary," and our Sunday School publications. In order that our people may be better informed along lines of work that make for progress—by learning of the good things our different churches are doing—we urge all our people to subscribe for and read these publications.

We feel that one of the causes of the slow growth of our denomination is the fact that most of our own people as well as outsiders know very little of the history and principles of the Christian denomination. Therefore, we further recommend to our people the series of booklets prepared by Dr. J. F. Burnett; viz.: "The Origin and Principles of the Christians" (Revised edition); and historical and biographical sketches of Rev. James O'Kelly, Rev. Abner Jones, Rev. Barton W. Stone, Rev. Elias Smith and Horace Mann. These booklets cost only the postage required in mailing them; and we feel that our people should avail themselves of this golden opportunity to acquaint themselves more fully with the origin and principles of the church of their choice.

We also feel that if our people are ever to become the missionary people that we should be, we shall have to begin with the children and educate them to the missionary idea, and instill into their hearts a passion for missions. Therefore, we suggest that such books as "Childrens Missionary Stories," by Hugh T. Kerr, and such magazines as "Everyland" be placed in the hands of the children.

In order that more people may be induced to read the right sort of literature and that those who do not feel able to purchase many books or subscribe to many periodicals may enjoy the privilege of good reading matter, we would urge upon our Sunday Schools and churches the necessity of a good library for each church or Sunday School.

REPORT ON MORAL REFORM

In the giving of the Great Commission the mantle of moral and spiritual leadership was laid upon the shoulders of the church. The world is, therefore, looking to the followers of Christ to take the initiative and set the pace for all moral and religious living.

We, therefore, recommend:

1. That the leaders and laymen of our church apply in both public and private life the principles as set forth in the Sermon on the Mount.

2. That we co-operate in every way possible in the matter of destroying all social evils which confront us today, such as illicit distilling, gambling, dancing, card playing, strikes and all forms of mob violence, etc.

3. That we register our most hearty approval of the recent enactment providing for moving picture censorship.

4. That we endorse public amusements only so far as clean, wholesome and elevating.

5. That we abhor the growing tendency on the part of many church people in the desecration of the Sabbath by turning it into a day of pleasure-seeking, and otherwise showing a laxity toward the church.

Then let us pray that as we live and move and have our being in the world we may not simply have the form of Godliness which is external and full of noise, but that we may truly possess the power of Godliness which is internal and full of existence.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

Since the spirit of Christianity and the spirit of Christian missions are inseparable, we cannot consistently call ourselves Christians unless we are

so imbued with the spirit of Christ that we are always anxious to help give the gospel message to others, whether they be our relatives, our neighbors, our fellow-countrymen, or the inhabitants of other continents and of the isles of the sea. Nor can we escape the responsibility of witnessing for Christ whenever we have opportunity and in every way possible to all people everywhere.

We rejoice to see the amount of enthusiasm for Christian Missions that has been manifested in the Virginia Valley Central Conference during the last several years.

We are glad to be able to report that many of our Sunday Schools are contributing one Sunday's offering in each month to the cause of missions; that we have three woman's, and at least one Young People's Missionary Societies; and that an effort is being made to inspire our people with a passion for world evangelization by means of sermons and talks on missions.

We are also grateful for the splendid work done in the interest of foreign missions, during the past conference year, by the Woman's Board of this Conference, which work was as follows: Literature distributed to the organized societies of the Conference to assist them in making out their programs; Missionary Institutes held in the month of May at five churches; money to the amount of \$32 raised by the young people of Winchester; a box containing gifts for the children sent to Miss Williams, in Porto Rico. In addition the sum of \$104.65 has been raised for foreign missions during the past year by our Women's and Young People's Societies.

However, we are not satisfied with our past achievements, or our present enthusiasm, but we urge our people to strive to accomplish much more along the line of foreign missions during the coming conference year. Therefore, we urge that our people organize Women's and Young People's Missionary Societies in every church, where possible, that does not already have such societies; that many more of our Sunday Schools contribute one Sunday's offering in each month to missions; and that our pastors and Sunday School superintendents see to it that some one talks missions to each Sunday School in the Conference at least once a month.

The development and progress of a church depends, in a vital way, upon its educational institutions. It is to them we must look for ministers and our trained lay workers; and if we are to keep our young people interested in our church we must educate them in our own institutions.

Elon College is the best college for the young people of this Conference. It has a high standard of scholarship, a high standard of character, and is reasonable in cost. It should have the loyal support of our people.

This Conference should, in the near future, follow the lead of the Georgia and Alabama Conferences and take steps to establish a Junior College.

Brother Wm. M. Clem, of the Dry Run Church, came before your committee requesting license to preach. We recommend that the request be granted and that he be licensed just before adjourning for the noon hour tomorrow. Brother Clem is a graduate of Elon College, and is preparing to attend Yale University this year.

Rev. D. B. Seal, an ordained minister of the Regular Baptist Church, requested to be admitted into our Conference. Owing to our limited acquaintance with Brother Seal, and his limited education, we recommend

that he be received on probation for a period of six months, during which time he shall be privileged to preach to any of our churches that may call him, and at the end of which time he shall give a detailed report to the Executive Committee of the Conference, who shall have power to continue his probation, abrogate it, or receive Brother Seal into our Conference, either as a licentiate or an ordained minister as they see fit.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION

We wish to register our faith in Christian education. This is a force that will enable people to build up to the level of their opportunity. We live in the midst of rivalries. We move in a circle of contention. We march against stern opposition. We are diverted by the conflicting claims of life. Organized agencies have turned civilization into a daily struggle. Deceitful action has disrupted the faith of many people. The world will gain its equilibrium by the right kind of education.

We rejoice in the hope that Bethlehem College, Wadley, Ala., is to open in September, 1923. This College will supply a long felt need in these conferences. For many years we have prayed for this College, and through our work and faith we are making it possible for God to answer our prayers. We urge the Churches and people of this conference to give complete co-operation and hearty support to this the greatest undertaking of the Christian Church in the far South.

We would also urge the parents in this conference to send their sons and daughters to this College as soon as they are ready to enter College. The College must depend largely on the constituency of the Christian Church for its patronage.

We would call the attention of this conference to the Chautauqua and School of Methods which will be held annually at Elon College, N. C. It would be a fine thing if each Church would send at least one representative to this Chautauqua. Through this agency great needs can be supplied for Christian work. Rev. W. W. Willingham has supplied the pulpit of the North Highlands Church once a month this year. His service has been appreciated by the people. We recommend that he be continued as a Licentiate for another year.

We recommend that C. L. Reese and Ellis Easterwood be continued as Licentiates for another year.

We recommend the Licensure of Argus C. Huckaby, William H. Brewer, Leon E. Oliver, Shafford, D. Langford, R. A. Whitten and W. T. Crowder.

We recommend that A. S. McDowell be dropped from the roll of Licentiates. That we raise \$150.00 this year for Ministerial education.

We recommend that our young men entering the Ministry prepare to enter Bethlehem College when it opens in September, 1923.

We recommend that Rev. B. A. Dees an ordained Minister who comes from the Baptist Church to our Church be given credentials for one year by this conference.

We recommend Elon College to all of our boys and girls who desire that higher training received in a standard college.

Reading Ministerial Reports.

Miss Olive G. Williams, Missionary to Porto Rico, spoke concerning the work in that field.

A petition properly drawn, according to the Government of the Christian Church, was presented from the Elm Avenue Christian Church, Portsmouth, asking for admission into the Conference. On motion the church was admitted to membership, and the delegates were enrolled.

Report on Christian Endeavor prepared by J. O. Wiggs, and read by Rev. E. B. Flory, was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR

To the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference—GREETING:

In our eagerness to establish and maintain equal rights, I fear that we have failed to discern between equal rights and equal ability. Every one should have equal right to achieve success in any undertaking, but that there are wide differences in ability cannot be denied. Some have more natural ability than others, but the vast majority is acquired by strenuous effort. Acquired ability is always along special lines of endeavor. God in His infinite wisdom never intended that any one person should acquire all the ability nor ability in all things; but a task for everyone, and each one for a single task. If Christianity is to take its proper place in our Church life we must recognize this fundamental principle. No one man can be a specialist along all lines but each one has a particular task and where effort is divided, ability to properly perform that task is reduced. In business life a man is employed for his special fitness and adaptation to the task, while frequently in Church work, as also in governmental work in our great Democracy selection is not made according to the special fitness but too often in an attempt at recognition of some friendly interest or special work performed; at other times because of lack of thought of the importance of the task, someone is selected without regard to their ability merely to fill in and make a misfit. I sometimes think we had better let the task go unperformed than to attempt to job with a bungling effort.

Our Christian Church not only has a task to perform but it has many tasks and as the work increases the diversity of tasks will also increase and in attempting to perform these tasks we owe it to the cause of Christ to select for the service the most capable person available, otherwise it may be better that the task be not undertaken.

Christian Endeavor is just one branch of our great Church organization, filling a particular and evergrowing need in training our young people for service. It is unfair to our young people, to ourselves and to the cause we represent to attempt to lead them with anyone less capable than our very best and when possible one especially trained for that service. We have recommended for adoption by our local churches Christian Endeavor Societies, but have never fully recognized them as a part of our organization in that we have not provided the proper co-operation and support. True, they are invited to report to our Sunday School Convention but Christian Endeavor is not a part of the Sunday School, though our Sunday Schools may eventually be enlarged into Church Schools embracing all lines of endeavor for the education of our people in the Christian graces. This failure of recognition of Christian Endeavor has caused many of the Societies to fail to report, failing to recognize the importance, or failing to recognize in us a sincere desire for their organization.

I believe that the Christian Endeavor is one of the very important branches of our organization, but at the same time, I have devoted my entire life to services in the Sunday School and at that I cannot give it justice and, to attempt to lead Christian Endeavor would necessitate diminution of my efforts along Sunday School lines and even then I could not do justice to Christian Endeavor. I believe that we ought to have as Chairman of the Christian Endeavor Committee of our Conference the most capable Christian Endeavor worker available, who can devote his entire attention to that work. The problem is one for careful thought and wise leadership to the end that its fullest possibilities may be developed. I, therefore, recommend that our incoming President seek from among our membership the most capable Christian Endeavor worker for the appointment as Chairman of this Committee and believe that ere next Conference convenes this work will be stimulated and we will have a report worthy of our consideration.

Conference met and called to order at 9:30 o'clock. Devotional service conducted by Rev. B. J. Earp. Minutes read and approved. Roll call. President appointed Revs. R. C. Helfenstein, L. E. Smith and J. L. Foster a Committee to submit revised form for Reports to Conference.

It was moved and carried that the Conference Sunday School and Christian Endeavor work be organized to conform to the Southern Christian Convention plans.

Report on Home Missions read by Col. J. E. West and adopted as follows:

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

The object of the Church being to save souls, we heartily endorse the action of the Southern Christian Convention in setting a minimum standard of ten per cent increase in membership per annum, and

We recommend as an evangelist, Rev. George D. Eastes, Norfolk, Va.

We recommend the employment of a Conference Missionary as early as practicable and suggest to the Mission Board of the Southern Christian Convention the advisability of paying his salary for the present.

We urge the prompt payment of subscriptions to the Men and Millions Movement and to the Special Mission Fund.

We renew our endorsement of the pastorate system and urge the building of parsonages by churches and pastorates.

As to appropriations, we recommend the following:

We congratulate the Southern Christian Convention and the Eastern Virginia Conference on their contributions for 1921 as indicated by statistics compiled by the chairman of this committee and included in this report.

The Southern Christian Convention with a membership of 28,251, contributed for all benevolences \$146,401.42, and for all other purposes, \$199,-

531.68. Grand total, \$345,933.11. Per capita for benevolences, \$5.18; for all purposes, \$12.24.

Considering our various methods of collecting funds, which causes a certain amount of overlapping, these figures are considered conservative.

Of the statistics used where contributions were accurate as to conferences, the Eastern Virginia Conference contributed 47 per cent. of conference assessments; 50 per cent. of all other purposes by churches, Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies; 62 per cent. of the Woman's Board, and 72 per cent. of Men and Millions. Therefore, the 50 per cent. estimate used in the last three items of the following report are very conservative.

Address by Dr. J. O. Atkinson, Mission Secretary. *Subject, "The Church a Revelation."*

Report of Committee on Education read by Dr. W. W. Staley, Chairman, and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION

The most distinguishing feature of modern education is its wider distribution. This alone characterizes it as democratic, not only in education itself, but in its far-reaching results upon nations. In fact, interchange of ideas and exchange of products, make the progress of which men boast.

The wider distribution of material products by land and sea creates business and increases intelligence. Education in this age is on the same world-wide scale.

The constitutional prohibition of the saloon, woman's suffrage, and the multiplication of improved public schools and good roads, indicate a trend toward better conditions for mankind. "Selective education" as advocated by President Ernest M. Hopkins, of Dartmouth College, will die in its infancy, or be a cripple from infantile paralysis. Seven-eighths of the public school teachers are women, and that means a fatal blow to aristocracy in education. Woman has been too recently emancipated from old exclusive conditions to teach anything that smacks of aristocracy. Democracy, in this large sense, is destined to rule the world. Oriental troubles may hasten that reign.

In the midst of such conditions, what is the function of the Christian college? To teach "In Essentials unity; in non-Essentials Liberty; in all things Charity." Aristocracy in religions is doomed, because it is as fatal in religion as it is in education or government. Jesus did not come to call the "righteous," but the "sinner." Character is fundamental, and Elon College stands for "Character first and always." There is no patent on character and no preference in its opportunity. As the Bible puts it, "High and low, rich and poor *together*." Antecedents sound well in family history, but subsequents determine achievements and history yet to be written. Character is regnant in human life and service determines success. The Christian college must train laymen and ministers into loyal life, and skilled workmen. The body, mind, and heart must be developed in the direction of life-service for God and humanity. That Elon College may do her part in this great work, the church people must send their boys and girls to their own college.

Rev. Dennis F. Parsons continues his studies in the University of Chicago, but has reported no plans for the future.

Harrold C. Hainer continues in Elon College and is making good progress. This committee granted him \$50.00 in May of this year, in addition to the \$150.00 granted him by the last Conference, making the total \$200.00.

Rev. J. B. Chadwick has been preaching for Wyoming and St. Paul, churches in Delaware, and reports that his work is satisfactory.

J. T. Harrod was granted \$225.00 for his expenses in Elon College last year; but he has decided to serve Damascus Church in Gates County the coming year, and desires license.

In December, 1921, our Committee recommended the licensure of J. N. Cutchin, of Rosemont Church; the Executive Committee approved the recommendation, and he was duly licensed under the direction of President W. M. Jay.

Rev. Elisha Bradshaw, who was licensed last year by the North Carolina Conference, and who was serving Elm Avenue Church in Portsmouth, received appointment to the Mountain work. It seemed to be necessary for him to be ordained before entering upon that field, and our Committee recommended his ordination. The Executive Committee approved, and he was duly ordained by President W. M. Jay, D. D., C. H. Rowland, D. D., and Rev. J. H. Lightbourne, at Holland, October 9, 1922.

The Committee had correspondence and personal interviews with Rev. S. S. Myrick, of Newsom, Va., about his transfer from the Methodist Church to the Christian Church, but nothing definite or final was reached.

We recommend:

1. That \$200.00 be loaned to Harrold C. Hainer, provided he needs it, for expenses in Elon College this scholastic year.
2. Upon the recommendation of South Norfolk Church we recommend that J. T. Harrod be licensed during this session of conference.
3. Upon the recommendation of Christian Temple, we recommend the

licensure of T. F. Wright, assistant to Rev. L. E. Smith, D. D., pastor of that church.

4. We recommend that Rev. B. J. Earp, pastor of East End Christian Church, Newport News, be received into the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference upon the certificate of the Executive Committee of the Virginia Valley Central Conference.

5. We recommend that the credentials of Rev. Hermon C. Taylor, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, be recognized by this Conference, and that this Conference issue license in place of his credentials from the Methodist Church.

6. We recommend the recognition of the ordination credentials of Rev. A. R. Flowers of the Western Conference, of the Original Free Will Baptist Church in North Carolina, and that ordination papers be issued to him by this Conference.

7. We recommend that William Davidson Parry be received into this Conference and ordained at this session of Conference.

8. We recommend that Rev. Edwin B. Flory, of the New York Eastern Christian Conference, be received as an elder into the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference.

9. We recommend that Rev. W. L. Wells be received as an elder into this Conference upon his credentials from the North Carolina Christian Conference.

10. We recommend that the transfer of Rev. T. E. White to this Conference from the North Carolina Christian Conference be approved upon the presentation of his credentials to the Executive Committee of this Conference.

11. We recommend that T. F. Wright and J. T. Harrod be licensed at this session of Conference by the President, Dr. W. M. Jay, and that William Davidson Parry be ordained by the following Presbytery: Revs. Drs. W. M. Jay, C. H. Rowland and R. C. Helfenstein.

WEDNESDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

Conference met and called to order at 2 o'clock. Devotional service conducted by Rev. W. L. Wells, Portsmouth, Va.

Report of Sunday Schools was read by Dr. L. E. Smith, Chairman, and adopted as follows:

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

The Sunday School work of our Conference is carried on through their own organization—the Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Convention of the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference.

The last session of this Convention held in July with the church at Berea, Norfolk County, Va., was inspirational and indicative of progress in all departments.

The following resolutions are submitted:

1. That the Secretary of the Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Convention of the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference be constituted the official statistician of the Conference for Sunday Schools, whose business it shall be to harmonize the annual reports of our schools to the Conference and Sunday School Association, and that the report as per enrollment to Conference shall be practically the same made to the Sunday School Association.

2. That we most heartily endorse the work done by Miss Lucy Eldredge, Field Secretary for the Sunday School for the Southern Christian Convention, and that this Conference authorize the Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Convention to amend its constitution so as to turn a larger per cent of its funds into the treasury of the Board of Religious Education.

3. That we request the Secretary of this Conference and the Recording Secretary of the Sunday School Convention to foot all tables presented for publication, including finances and membership, with totals so that our handbooks shall be more easy and of workable use.

4. That we ask the President of the Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Convention to enter upon an energetic campaign, through the Convention, to make the enrollment of the Sunday Schools equal to the Church membership of the Conference.

The Claims of the Christian Missionary Association were presented by Rev. O. D. Poythress, President, and several new memberships were enrolled.

Report on Religious Literature was presented, and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

The principles of the Christian Church are Bible principles, the Bible is the greatest of all religious literature; we, therefore, urge upon our people a more careful and prayerful reading and study of the Scriptures.

We urge upon our people a more loyal support of our own Christian Sun, feeling that it is needed both for nurture and news.

We also recommend the Herald of Gospel Liberty, our National weekly and the oldest religious paper published.

We recommend the Christian Missionary, the publication of our Mission Board, Dr. W. P. Minton, editor.

We recommend religious books to our people and urge an interest in works that treat the great political and economical questions of our day from the Christian viewpoint.

We recommend that our people use discretion in the choice of books and periodicals for their homes. This is a very vital matter and one in which there is too frequently no concern manifested at all.

THIRD DAY—FORENOON SESSION

Thursday, November 2, 1922.

Conference met at 9:30 o'clock. Devotional service conducted by Rev. Elisha Bradshaw.

Minutes of yesterday read and approved.

It was moved and carried that Rev. E. B. Flory be requested to furnish the sermon delivered last evening, for publication in THE CHRISTIAN SUN.

Report of Committee on Moral Reform was read by Rev. W. B. Fuller, and adopted as follows:

REPORT ON MORAL REFORM

Your Committee on Morals presents the following for your consideration:

Through our country there seems to be a lack of appreciation and reverence for the Sabbath day. Instead of making it a day of rest and worship, many make it a day of amusement and pleasure.

We have good state and national laws, but in places they are not always enforced or respected. There is not enough Bible reading and prayer connected with our home life.

Our young people need to be provided with innocent amusement and recreation at home and church, and encouraged to stay there, rather than go to the world for sinful pleasure. Therefore, we recommend:

I. That the Christian Sabbath be observed as a day for ministering Christian service, worship and devotion to God.

II. That we take our stand against gambling, games of chance, modern dancing, and all other features of worldly conduct condemned by the Bible, and not in harmony with the Spirit of Jesus Christ.

III. That as far as possible we provide playgrounds, amusements, good books, pictures and music for the entertainment of our young, both discouraging and condemning vaudevilles, and movies, unless such programs are educational and wholesome in their composition.

IV. That parents be urged, for the sake of their children, to read the Bible and pray daily with their children in the home, thus making a definite devotional atmosphere, such as will be life-lasting.

V. That we endorse the system of education adopted by the State Board of Virginia, allowing courses in Bible, or Religious Education, to be substituted for high school work, and urge our young people to avail themselves of this opportunity.

VI. (a) That we deplore the present laxity in regard to law, and law enforcement. He who obeys only such laws as please himself is an anarchist in spirit, and the greatest tragedy which could come to our beloved land would be to leave unchecked the present serious outbreak of lawlessness. So we urge our people, as individuals and churches, to obey the laws of our country, and aid in every possible way in securing their enforcement, and teach our children a just respect for the law in the home, the school and the church.

(b) Knowing, as we do, that the forces of evil are ever active, we insist that an intensive campaign of *Education* continue to be carried on among our children and young people, against the evils of the liquor traffic. The propaganda of the "wets" is everywhere, while we have been inclined to rest upon our oars. Let us beware lest we become defeated through negligence, remembering that no law is ever fully obeyed except through the intelligent co-operation of the people; therefore let us educate! *Educate!* EDUCATE!

VII. That a copy of this report be mailed to each local church, by the Secretary, or a special committee, for that purpose, with instruction that it be read and discussed in the local church.

Address by Dr. J. P. Barrett.

Report of the Woman's Board was read by Mrs. C. H. Rowland, and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSION BOARD

The Bible is our best mission study book. It is interspersed with the spirit of missions from cover to cover. We hold that the Christian does not enter into missionary interest and activity, because it is commanded in the Bible, but because the spirit of Christ impels him in his heart. He only looks to the Bible for his direction and inspiration. The heart of the obedient child of God burns to make Christ known and seeks to save souls. The needs of the world are being so overwhelmingly revealed to us today and the truth is so insistently borne in upon us that Christianity is the only remedy for a torn and suffering and sinning world that not to give the gospel is to deny our Lord and to be false to our profession.

Every means available for stirring the church to a cause of her opportunity and arousing her to the privilege of service afforded her should be encouraged. The Woman's Missionary work which carries with it the stimulating and directing of the youth of our churches along the lines of missionary truth and endeavor has proven to be one of the most potent and efficient agencies in our churches for accomplishing this. "Ill fares the church and to hastening ills a prey" where the women have no vision of the service they may render the kingdom by combining their efforts, contributions and prayers, and by training of a generation in whom the forces of missionary interest and zeal will have been kindled in their earliest years. Then the men and the women will be ready to answer the call with their lives and the millions will be forthcoming to maintain the work.

We hold that the pastor is the keyman to the situation. He can unlock the church to the missionary cause or he can lock it so securely that no missionary interest can enter. The pastor who is burdened to have his church catch the missionary spirit can begin in no better way than by organizing the women of his church and through them inculcate missionary truths in the hearts of the young life of his church.

Our Woman's Board continues along the same general lines of last year. Our aim is for \$1200 for the Richmond work and a like amount for the China field, for which field we have accumulated approximately \$300.

The Young People will support the Mountain and Santa Isabel work. Our one-day schools of mission were highly successful and will be conducted during the coming year. The attendance at our last Woman's Missionary Conference was the largest in our history. The amount contributed during the year was \$5,040.00.

Report on Foreign Missions was read by Dr. W. D. Harward, and adopted as follows:

FOREIGN MISSION REPORT

The far-sighted policy of our General Mission Board, including plans for enlarged equipment in both of our present mission fields, has been

adopted, not only because of evident needs but because of faith in our people to co-operate in our forward movement. The enlargement can only be effected by the co-operation of our entire brotherhood.

Attention is called to a most encouraging increase in sympathetic interest in missions, evidenced by increased financial receipts. We urge our people to co-operate with the Mission Board of the Southern Christian Convention, to whom has been assigned the oversight of the work of forwarding our Men and Millions movement and to our Mission Secretary who has been working so faithfully to awaken renewed interest in this movement.

With systematic missionary instruction in our Sunday schools, together with opportunity and encouragement for definite giving for missions, we face a day of enlargement in our mission endeavors. We recommend that such a program be put on in every Sunday school.

The claims of the Great Commission should be instilled into the minds and hearts of our young people. They should be brought up in an atmosphere charged with the spirit of missions. Let the Bible be held up as God's book on missions. Missionary literature including books and periodicals should be placed in the hands of our people. Our own Christian Missionary is invaluable to us as a people. We urge that our people subscribe to and read the Christian Sun. It has something good and helpful each week in the line of missions.

Let us keep before our people a vision of the whitened fields and encourage them to pray the Lord of the harvest to thrust forth laborers. We would call attention to China as our next prospective mission field and urge that we pray for the men in training for this field and for God's leadership in entering the same.

That we express, by rising vote, our keen appreciation to the Pastor, members and friends of this church and congregation, to the Friends Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church of Sedley, for their exceeding kindness and generous hospitality accorded this Conference during this session. Further, that special and grateful thanks be tendered the pastor, Rev. Nathan Pickett, and the Friends Church, for the reception and sumptuous supper served in the basement of their church on Wednesday night. The fellowship and hospitality of this meeting were unprecedented and the finest demonstration of Christian Unity ever witnessed by this Conference.

2. That this Conference create a Department of Evangelism. That this Department shall have a Secretary, elected by this Conference, whose business it shall be, in co-operation with the Mission Board, to direct the churches of this Conference in their efforts to realize the proposed ten per cent annual increase in church membership.

3. That this Conference hereby memorialize the Executive Committee of the Southern Christian Convention to appoint a Commission to discuss the advisability of Christian Union with the Freewill Baptist Church of North Carolina, and request the North Carolina Christian Conference to join with us in this Memorial. The Commission to report to the Convention in extraordinary Session in May, 1923.

4. That we congratulate the Conference upon the fine Christian spirit, the progress among the churches, and the outlook for the future; and we cannot refrain from expressing recognition and appreciation of the visitors who have contributed so helpfully to the cause to which we have committed our lives and our means.

5. That we reaffirm our confidence in the Men and Millions Movement and that we call upon our pastors and churches to do their best to meet their obligations and to give every possible support to our Mission Secretary, Dr. J. O. Atkinson, in his heroic efforts to carry to successful completion the great movement.

Dr. G. O. Lankford submitted a report from the Special Committee appointed by the Southern Christian Convention, and the Executive Committee of the Southern Christian Convention.

The report failed of adoption.

Rev. P. T. Klapp offered the following resolution :

That the Conference hereby resolve to remain united for three years, and pay the indebtedness at certain Mission points. On motion, the resolution was adopted.

On motion, Conference adjourned until Wednesday at 9 A. M. Prayer led by Rev. T. E. White.

SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION.

Conference met at 9 A. M., and was called to order by Rev. T. E. White in the absence of the President and Vice-President.

Devotional Services led by Brother White.

Moved and carried that in the absence of committees that are to report, that the Conference now hear Miss Lucy Eldredge.

Miss Eldredge presented the work she is doing as Field Secretary for the Board of Religious Education.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Missions is the key word to the saving of the world. Truly the spirit and thought of missions should be carried into every department of our church work. Our Saviour's mission to the world should convince us that he was the greatest missionary the world has ever had. After he had solved the great mission problem, he turned it over to his disciples and commanded them to carry it to all the world, even to every creature. Mark 16:15. We are glad and thankful to report progress in our work in the Foreign Fields.

JAPAN

During the past quadrennium, there has been an increase of more than two hundred in the membership of the churches in Japan. We have in Japan, nine Missionaries; thirteen Japanese ordained ministers; one Japanese Evangelist; three Bible Women; three theological students; five students, training for kindergarten work; seven kindergarten teachers in active service; seventeen organized churches, with a membership of 1562; and Sunday schools with an enrollment of 2,057, with a teaching force of 98. The Japan churches raised during the past quadrennium \$7,424.83. We note with pleasure that the Japanese churches have paid to their native pastors during the past four years \$1,862.00. This shows that the Japanese Christians are not only willing to be saved themselves, but are willing to support those who are trying to evangelize their nation. The Christian Church now has a fine opportunity in Japan to have a worthy part in making Japan Christian.

PORTO RICO

We have in Porto Rico, one missionary family, Rev. D. P. Barrett and wife; one single lady missionary; four native preachers, only one of whom is ordained, who have charge of the various preaching places; one Bible woman; one kindergarten worker; one industrial school conducted by Miss Williams; four organized churches; nine out-posts, with a membership of 255. The total enrollment in Sunday schools is 685.

We have four church buildings. We also have three or four buildings at out stations which are used for preaching places. We very especially need more missionaries for this field, and also more money for the support of this field. We regard the work here as in an encouraging condition. Brother D. P. Barrett has been very faithful in his Porto Rican charge. When we see what has been accomplished in the last thirty years; starting with only thirty-five cents, and now having between twenty and thirty churches and preaching places, a membership of nearly two thousand, and property worth more than one hundred thousand dollars; we should by this time see that our labors and sacrifices have not been in vain. Hence we should not fear to open up a work in China, which we soon hope to do. The success with which we have met, and the inviting fields opening before us and calling us to come over and help, should inspire us with a determination to give a larger support to the Foreign Mission cause.

Here we stop and humbly bow our hearts and heads before God who doeth all things well. He has called from labor to reward, our venerable, and beloved brother, Rev. J. G. Bishop, who was so deeply interested in the cause of Foreign Missions, and for many years took an active part in supporting and conducting it.

We feel that the mission call was never so urgent, and the demand for a better support never so imperative as it is now. In order to meet this demand, let us try to get every member of our churches to become a member of our missionary societies, and thereby become a missionary church. We should teach missions in the Sunday school, in the prayer meetings, from every pulpit, and in every religious service. We recommend to our people the taking, and reading of the CHRISTIAN SUN, and our Missionary Magazine. THE SUN is published in Richmond, Va., and the CHRISTIAN MISSIONARY in Dayton, Ohio.

We further recommend:

- (1) That each pastor be urged to keep the subject of missions constantly before his congregation.
- (2) That each church be asked to have a mission day service during the year; consisting of songs, recitations, lectures, and offerings.

Rev. M. E. Cotton, representing the Anti-Saloon League of North Carolina, was presented to the Conference, and made an address concerning the work of enforcing prohibition.

By vote the Conference expressed its appreciation of Mr. Cotton's message.

On motion Rev. J. W. Holt was elected to represent the Conference in the North Carolina Anti-Saloon League.

Rev. L. A. Ledbetter, of the M. P. Church, was presented to the Conference, and invited to a seat as a deliberative member.

On motion the Conference adjourned.

SECOND DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

The Conference was called to order by the President. Period of worship was conducted by Rev. G. O. Lankford.

Moved and carried that items omitted from the morning program be taken up in order.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR

Your committee finds by comparing the reports of our Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies to this Conference, and to our Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Convention held in July, that these departments of the work are increasing in membership, attendance and enthusiasm; and we feel that this is largely due to the faithful and efficient service of our Board of Religious Education, and to the untiring efforts of our devoted field secretary, Miss Lucy M. Eldredge, in organizing new schools and societies, and bringing to life the dead ones.

We are convinced in our own minds that no board or department in our Church has more responsibility, and a broader field of service than the Board of Religious Education in its work among our young people in the Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Societies, and for this Board to continue to function as it should, requires the hearty and united support of our entire brotherhood: we therefore recommend:

1. That the workers in our churches frequently call upon our Field Secretary, Miss Eldredge, for information and service to aid in promoting the religious educational work of their respective churches.

2. That every church in this Conference organize and keep alive a Sunday School, and a Christian Endeavor Society.

3. That each school and society strive to reach, and maintain the Front Line Standard, and that a monthly offering be taken for our Mission Board, and a monthly offering for our Orphanage.

4. That the work of Week Day Religious Instruction and the Daily Vacation Bible School be endorsed by this Conference, and the value of this work impressed upon our churches.

5. That this Conference continue its endorsement of the work, by stipulating the second week in July of each year as "Our Convention Week," and donating at least \$200.00 through the Board of Religious Education to this cause.

6. That every one of our Sunday Schools observe Men and Millions Day in January, 1923. Program for the day to be furnished.

THIRD DAY—MORNING SESSION

Conference met at 9 A. M. and was called to order by the President.

Devotional Services conducted by Rev. G. O. Lankford.

Dr. W. C. Wicker presented the following resolution:

Whereas there is a motion passed to continue the N. C. Christian Conference for three years; it is moved that the three original Conferences be authorized to reorganize with the same officers and committees as were in office at the time of the merger.

On motion the resolution was adopted.

Rev. Stanley C. Harrell offered the following resolution:

That the local Conferences be requested to hold their annual meetings before the date for the annual session of the N. C. Christian Conference, which meets on Tuesday following the second Sunday in November.

That the membership of the N. C. Christian Conference shall consist of, First, all ordained ministers holding membership in the local Conferences, and Second, lay delegates elected by the local Conferences, on the basis of one lay delegate for each two hundred members or major fraction thereof within said local Conference.

It is furthermore requested that a Commission of Polity be appointed to draw up, and submit to the N. C. Christian Conference during its present session, Articles of Agreement outlining the scope of work, and authority to be exercised both by the local Conference and by the General Conference.

On motion the resolution was adopted.

Supt. Chas. D. Johnson presented the claims of the Christian Orphanage. Moved and unanimously carried that the Conference endorse the work being done by Superintendent Johnson at the Orphanage.

Dr. W. A. Harper presented the report for the Committee on Christian Union as follows:

The recent session of the Eastern Virginia Conference called on this body

The recent session of the American Christian Convention began with a sermon on Christian Union, and throughout the eight days of the Convention the necessity of this next step in the progress of the Kingdom was constantly referred to. A Standing Committee on Christian Union was appointed, and ordered to make overtures to other Churches looking to the reunion of the Church of Christ.

The recent session of the Eastern Virginia Conference called on this body to join them in a joint Memorial to the Executive Committee of the Southern Christian Convention to appoint a Commission at once to make overtures to the Free-Will Baptist Church in this state looking to union with our people. We recommend that your Committee on Christian Union be authorized to join in this Memorial.

We call special attention to the World Conference on Faith and Order which meets in Washington, D. C. in May. We recommend that this Conference elect a representative to attend this the greatest gathering to consider the theme of Christian Union ever assembled in the United States.

Dr. N. G. Newman reported for the Committee on Education as follows:

The rapid development and increasing efficiency of public education is a challenge to the church. The State may educate, but the church must Christianize education. The American Christian Convention has coordinated its educational work under one department with a general Secretary of Education. The Southern Christian Convention is projecting Bethlehem College, Wadley, Ala., as a junior Christian college. Our people are appreciating more the advantages of Elon College as evidenced by an increase of 20 per cent. this year in the number of students from our own church. There is also an increase in the number of ministerial students.

We recommend:

1. That our people continue their loyalty to Elon College both in moral and financial support.
2. That our ministers seek to enlighten and be helpful to our young people in deciding the great question of life service.
3. That we endorse the Church's system of education as adopted by the Board of Education.

LICENTIATES

G. C. Crutchfield is a member of the Junior Class at Elon College and has been preaching for four years as a licentiate. He applies for ordination, and is recommended by the Church of which he is pastor. After due examination we recommend his ordination.

M. T. Sorrell, now in the Sophomore Class at Elon College, has been preaching one year as a licentiate. He applies for ordination and is recommended by his Church, but it is the judgment of your committee that it would be best for him to continue longer as a licentiate.

W. T. Scott and S. M. Lynam, of the Junior Class at Elon College, are serving churches and pursuing their studies.

I. T. Underwood, R. H. Coble, D. T. McKinney, and John M. Allred are doing Christian work as opportunity affords. We recommend that all these licentiates be continued as such.

CANDIDATES

E. C. Brady and H. E. Crutchfield, students in Elon College, have applied for licensure. We have duly examined them and recommend their licensure.

W. B. Terrell continues his studies in Elon College.

J. F. Johnson, a member of Wake Chapel Church, applies for licensure. We have carefully examined him, and recommend his licensure.

Archie H. Hook, a Junior at Elon College and a member of the Elon College Christian Church, applies for licensure. After due examination we recommend his licensure.

E. C. Jenkins, Thomasville, N. C., formerly a licentiate in the Georgia and Alabama Conference and now a member of Pleasant Union Church, asks for recognition as a licentiate in the Conference. We recommend that he be received as a candidate for the ministry until such time as he shall prove himself fitted for licensure according to the requirements of this Conference.

Rev. W. L. Wells, Portsmouth, Va., asks for a letter of transfer to the East Virginia Christian Conference. Rev. Hamilton J. Fleming, South Portland, Me., asks for a transfer to the Cumberland Association of Congregational Churches and Ministers. We recommend these transfers.

Rev. S. L. Beougher, Graham, N. C., desires to become a member of this Conference. We recommend that he be received, and that his letter from the Rockingham Conference, Mass., be deposited with the Secretary of Conference.

Rev. T. E. White asks for a letter of transfer to the East Virginia Christian Conference. We recommend that it be granted.

We recommend a loan of \$150.00 to G. C. Crutchfield, and \$100 to H. E. Crutchfield, to aid them in paying their expenses in Elon College, and that the chairman of this committee order the payment of these loans in three equal installments, Decemeber 1, March 1, and May 1.

Letters of Christian greetings were read from Revs. W. G. Clements, J. D. Wicker and J. W. Wellons.

On motion the Secretary was requested to convey to these brethren the assurance of the Conference's regard, affection, and prayers.

Rev. C. B. Riddle reported for the Committee on Religious Literature as follows:

A nation can rise no higher than the literature it produces. The literary production of a nation is its intellectual index. A church cannot produce great men without great literature. The first of the church's great literature is the Bible, and this book must be the central theme of all religious litera-

ture; it must be the foundation of all writings and teachings for the world's uplift. Religious literature is the channel of religious thought, religious inspiration, and religious belief. It is the channel of missionary effort, of Christian education, and of mind direction for the Kingdom's progress and growth.

We cannot believe that the Bible is being discarded. The increasing number of volumes of the Bible, sold every year, is our greatest witness to this statement. There are more people reading the Bible today than ever known. The conspicuous place that the family Bible once made in the home may no longer be observed, but it is being individually read in religious books, magazines, and in multiplied forms. We cannot believe that the Bible is being denied, as many think it is. Our own church allows individual interpretation; and individual interpretation is not unbelief. It is the seeking for all the truth in various forms.

Wherever the Bible is read and studied religious belief and conviction spring up. Wherever religious periodicals are read religious interests are awakened. The church paper is the greatest missionary of the church. The paper is the pioneer missionary, and to neglect its place in our church life is to cut off one of our main arteries of life. We often speak of the church paper suffering; this is not correct. It is the church itself that suffers. The church paper is mute, silent, but lasting and powerful. It finds its way into homes where no pastor ever goes, where no other missionary ever plants his or her feet. Its pages make daily and weekly visitations where pastors make monthly, quarterly, or yearly calls.

The church paper is one piece of literature that we cannot afford to neglect. We, therefore, call upon this Conference for a renewed interest, for a greater pledge, for a more definite support of all our papers. The CHRISTIAN SUN is our first consideration. It should be in every home of our great church. The HERALD OF GOSPEL LIBERTY, the oldest religious newspaper in the world, should have a larger circulation among us. The CHRISTIAN MISSIONARY should be the hand-book in every missionary society as a medium of ideas, inspiration, and missionary interest.

We urge the members of this Conference to help exalt the place of religious books, tracts, pamphlets, and papers in our homes. We would suggest that each pastor preach at least one sermon each year on the subject of religious literature, and in so doing show to the congregation samples of our own literature, bring to the attention of the people the men and women who produce our literature, and thus help to teach our people of our own literature and our own writers. We solicit the co-operation of our people in studying closely our own principles, our history, and program in the world evangelization.

We would recommend that when new members are received into church fellowship that mention be made of the church paper as a part of the Christian's study and reading.

We would recommend that pastors teach their lay members that it is largely their part to help circulate the church paper.

We would recommend that church deacons be taught that it is their duty to read and support the church paper as part of their duty toward the church.

We would recommend that all candidates for the ministry be requested to be a subscriber to the church paper and to possess a copy of the Government and Principles of the Christian Church.

Christians First.

BY PRESIDENT W. A. HARPER, LL. D.

The Scriptures record that the disciples were called Christians first at Antioch. Our Church has never been large in numbers, but it has been great in leadership. History reveals the Christians first, among others, in the following important respects:

1. *Spiritual Democracy*.—We first took the Church from the few and made it a brotherhood of the saints. We matched political with spiritual democracy. The liberty of conscience or the right of private judgment in all disputed matters has, from the beginning, made it possible for persons of widely divergent theological views to live and work in harmony in our spiritual household.

2. *Religious Journalism*.—The "Herald of Gospel Liberty" (note its name) is the oldest religious newspaper in the world.

3. *Recognition of Womanhood*.—We first ordained women to be preachers and accorded women full rights in the Church.

4. *Public Education*.—Through Horace Mann, we gave the nation its free public school system.

5. *Co-Education*.—Antioch College first admitted men and women on equal terms to all the privileges of higher education.

6. *Interdenominational Co-Operation*.—We led in the Church Federation Movement of Maine, whence came the idea of the Federal Council. We have furnished far more than our quota of leadership in the interdenominational movements, such as the Sunday School, Christian Endeavor, the Y. M. C. A., and the Federal Council. We interdenominationalized Christian Endeavor. During the war, Camp Upton was the most strategic center of Christian activity, and Hermon Eldredge was camp general secretary there.

7. *Moral Reform*.—The temperance movement began in one of our Churches—Pleasant Hill, Alamance County, N. C. The anti-slavery movement also began in one of our Churches—Smith's Mills, Mass. No moral reform ever addressed itself to the Christian conscience without hearty support among our people.

8. *Stewardship*.—In the various forward movements of recent years, we had the highest goal—ten dollars per member per year for benevolences over a period of five years for the whole Church, and sixteen dollars a year in the Southern Christian Convention.

9. *Christian Union*.—Our Church came into being to foster and promote Christian Union. We have practiced it, too, and hence we are small numerically. We are correspondingly great in spirit.

10. *Christian Education*.—And in these latter days, God has given it us to lead in a unified and correlated program of Christian education reaching from our homes, through our Churches and communities, to our colleges and other institutions of higher learning.

It is great to belong to such a Church.

Report of Committee on Temperance was read and adopted, as follows:

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE AND MORAL REFORM.

We often hear people speak of the wonderful progress of the past century, and ascribe it to reason. They are mistaken. Reason, speaking by the mouth of Aristotle, had laid down as an axiom that the inferior races are designed by nature to be the slaves of the superior races. The emancipation of the slave, the banishing of the saloon, the closing of the brothel, were effected when it was clearly seen that they were against the will and the religion of Jesus Christ; and when men are emancipated from want, ignorance, and crime, it will take place by the same means. Sociologists may prescribe, anarchists and saloonists may plot, Socialists may scheme, but power to lift humanity comes from religion.

We pay taxes to take up the wounded, secure antiseptics, put them to bed, and pay the keeper of the inn, but we too often fail to make the road to Jericho safe.

Perhaps there never was a time when the people of this country needed to heed the teachings of Jesus Christ more than now. Too many Church members seem to think that great evils can be removed merely by talking about them. Many of our citizens hold meetings, pass resolutions, listen to eloquent orators, sing songs, shake hands, and go home. Their voices soon die away. The crowds being disbursed, the resolutions are soon forgotten. And many imagine that these things can take the place of deeds. Jesus, it would seem, placed little reliance on things of this kind. When He sent out His disciples, He did not say, "Pass resolutions," but "Heal the sick, cast

out devils, freely ye have received, freely give." Some words and some resolutions are good, but the only words that are heeded much are the words of a man of action. "The wicked flee, when no man pursueth," but they break the speed limit when a brave and loyal officer of the law is after them.

While this Convention is in no sense a political Convention, and your Committee would not, in the remotest way, say for what political party its members should vote, we desire it to be distinctly understood that as good and loyal citizens of the United States, we would "render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and unto God the things that are God's."

Resolved 1: That we stand for "temperance in all things," moral reform, law, and order.

Resolved 2: That we will not, knowingly, support any person for any position who does not, by word, and act, stand for these things.

Resolved 3: We have no sympathy with, or vote for, any person who, by word or act, resorts to any unlawful means to overthrow the Constitutions of our States or the United States of America.

Resolved 4: That we pledge ourselves to co-operate with all law-abiding citizens in promoting the cause of temperance, moral reform, and the advancement of the Redeemer's kingdom in the world.

Report of Commission on Church Union with the Free Will Baptist Church read by Dr. W. A. Harper, and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF CHRISTIAN UNION COMMISSION.

The Eastern Virginia and North Carolina Conferences, at their regular sessions last fall, memorialized the Executive Committee of the Convention to appoint a Commission on Christian Union. The Convention appointed the following persons on the Commission: Dr. L. E. Smith, Dr. C. H. Rowland, Dr. W. W. Staley, Dr. J. O. Atkinson, Rev. A. R. Flowers, D. R. Fonville, and W. A. Harper. Dr. L. E. Smith was made Chairman, and W. A. Harper, Secretary.

Correspondence was entered into with Rev. R. F. Pittman, President of the Free Will Baptist Convention, which resulted in a meeting of our Commission with theirs in the Hotel Bland, Raleigh, N. C., February 12, 1923.

At this meeting, full and free and brotherly discussion was had respecting the positions, beliefs, and practices of the two Churches, and the following agreement entered into:

AGREEMENT BETWEEN FREE WILL BAPTIST AND CHRISTIAN CHURCHES.

We, representing the Free Will Baptist Churches and Christian Churches, hereby agree—

1. That Jesus is the Head of His Church.
2. That the Bible is the sufficient rule of faith and practice.
3. That Christian character is the proper test of fellowship in the Church of Christ.
4. That the right of private judgment or the liberty of conscience is a privilege and duty of all.
5. That the reciprocity of ministers and members between our Churches is desirable.
6. That the name of the Church of Christ is a matter for His followers to determine, though Christian is a proper name for all believers.
7. That the local Church should be autonomous.
8. That fraternal delegates should be interchanged for our public assemblies.

9. That we should write for each other's periodicals and visit and use each other's institutions.

10. That a united Protestantism is the goal of our Churches.

It was further agreed at this meeting to send at least five (5) fraternal delegates to each other's general Church meetings, to print the agreements in our Church papers and to exchange with each other's members 200 copies each of the *Free Will Baptist* and THE CHRISTIAN SUN.

WHAT HAS BEEN DONE.

The Proceedings of the Raleigh meeting were printed in our Church papers. Dr. W. C. Wicker wrote an article for the *Free Will Baptist*, copies of our papers have been interchanged, ten brethren of the Free Will Baptist Church have been designated to attend this session of our Convention, and space has been allotted the question of "Christian Union" in our program, with Rev. Thomas E. Beamon, of the Free Will Baptist Church, as one of the speakers.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

We feel that our work has already borne good fruit in the better understanding of our two Churches, and we recommend:

1. That the Convention elect a Commission on Christian Union, to continue to cultivate closer relations and co-operation with all denominations, and with the Free Will Baptist in particular, and that the members of the Commission be our fraternal delegates to visit other Church bodies.

2. That we send five fraternal delegates to the Free Will Baptist Convention, which meets at Winterville, N. C., on September 11-13, 1923.

3. That at this time we formally receive the Free Will Baptist fraternal delegates, invite them to seats as visiting brethren with us and record our profound satisfaction at their presence at this session.

4. That we invite them to send fraternal delegates to our public assemblies, and that such delegates be given opportunity to be heard at every such meeting.

5. That special prayer be now offered for the progress of Christian Union in our own and other Churches.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

Convention met and called to order at 2 o'clock. Worship conducted by Rev. R. L. Williamson.

Report of the Board of Education was read by Dr. W. A. Harper, Chairman, and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Christian education—Christ through education—is the hope of the world. A nation that has separated education and religion must find a solution to the problem such separation has entailed. A democracy cannot exist without a citizenry of character, and character apart from religion, all experience teaches, is impossible.

This means but one thing for the Christian Church—the strengthening of her agencies of education. The home, the Church, the college, with all their auxiliary organizations and institutions, must be federated into a unified program of Christian education. Our young people should be educated in our colleges, and our colleges must be made in every way worthy of their support and patronage.

THE CRISIS AT ELON.

In view of these great principles, the crisis precipitated at Elon on January 18, 1923, demands of our people a full measure of sacrifice and loyalty. The burning of the administration building and records, together with the library and auditorium, was a blow well calculated temporarily to close down the college. But we are happy to record that only one day was lost by our college in adjusting herself to the new situation, and that not a student left on account of the fire. This is a situation calling for satisfaction and congratulation on the part of our people.

On January 24th, the Board of Trustees assembled in extraordinary session and faced the crisis with heroic determination. They voted to rebuild on a \$300,000 basis, being challenged to do so by the citizens of Alamance County, who proposed to pay one-third of such an amount. In addition, they voted to raise \$300,000 for endowment. Both decisions seemed absolutely necessary in view of the situation confronting the college.

What has transpired since has gratified every heart. We are yet some distance from our goal, but we are facing the future heroically, hopefully, confidently. We urge our people to sacrifice, as never before, for our college, that a disaster, which seemingly threatened Elon's very existence, may prove a blessing in disguise. Many have expressed the conviction that it would be so, but unless our people support such a conviction with sacrificial giving, it will not be so. Again we urge them to sacrifice nobly for our college, and full endorsement of the trustees' action is hereby recorded.

BETHLEHEM COLLEGE.

The Board of Trustees of Bethlehem College have let the contract for their first building for the sum of \$14,000, and plan to open the institution to students this fall. The plan permits the basement to be used for dining-room, kitchen, furnace, and storage, with the first floor for offices, recitations, library, president's home, and laboratory work, with the third floor as a dormitory for lady teachers and lady students. The men students will room in homes nearby, but dine in the boarding department.

Bethlehem is to be of junior college grade, with a full standard high school course preceding. It will fill a large need in our educational work, and we should give it every encouragement.

COLLEGE DAY.

"College Day" was celebrated in our Churches during the summer of 1922. The people enjoyed the programs, and great good was accomplished. This is a custom that should be kept up perpetually. Some Churches can use one month to better advantage than another. We, therefore, suggest that June, July and August be considered college months, and that Elon and Bethlehem Colleges both be represented in the programs from now on.

ELON TRUSTEES.

We recommend that the Secretary of State of North Carolina be requested to amend the charter of Elon College so as to permit a total of thirty trustees instead of twenty-four, as at present, with a quorum of ten instead of eight, as at present.

Resolutions offered by Rev. E. B. Flory and I. W. Johnson concerning special days for emergency fund and library fund of the colleges referred to the Committee on Finance.

Report of the Board of Religious Education submitted by Dr. W. T. Walters, Chairman, and adopted, as follows, items referring to finance being referred to Committee on Finance:

REPORT OF BOARD OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION.

To the Southern Christian Convention, in session at Henderson, N. C., May 1-3, 1923:

Report of work of office of field secretary, May 1, 1923.

Tabulation of Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Reports.

List of all Sunday School and Christian Endeavor workers is kept in the office. A handbook was edited and published, giving minutes of five Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Conventions held in 1922, and statistical tables for both organizations, as far as statistics could be obtained. Two thousand copies were published and mailed free of cost to all ministers and Churches in the Southern Christian Convention. The handbook showed 200 Sunday Schools, with membership of 20,618. The Southern Christian Convention Annual, published some months later, shows 201 Sunday Schools, with a membership of 22,165 (Georgia-Alabama statistics from handbook), 71 Christian Endeavor Societies—junior, intermediate, senior and alumni—have been reported during the year. Definite statistics regarding membership could not be secured from all, but all have been active this year.

Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Conventions.

Five Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Conventions were held in 1922, including two new Conventions, organized in Georgia and in Alabama. The field secretary attended all sessions except the 1922 session of the Alabama Convention. Four of the Conventions already are working on 1923 programs, and one Convention has been held—Alabama. The office of the field secretary co-operated in planning programs, sending out report blanks, and sending letters to all teachers and officers, urging attendance at the Conventions. In the North Carolina Convention, the field secretary acted as both general secretary

and recording secretary in arranging program and recording minutes. Leaflets were distributed at all Conventions.

Chautauqua and School of Methods.

The 1922 session of the Chautauqua and School of Methods was held at Elon College August 30th to September 4th. The attendance was small, but otherwise the session was very helpful. Forty-three enrolled for the week, and a great many others attended one or more classes and the evening sessions. Averaging daily attendance at the various classes was as follows: Pastors—Dr. W. W. Staley, teacher, 15; Sunday School organization—Prof. A. L. Hook, 4; adult workers—W. P. Lawrence, 4; elementary workers—Mrs. Bullock, 6; missions—Dr. J. O. Atkinson, 20; Bible—Dr. J. U. Newman, 20; daily vacation Bible School, over 50. Financially, Elon College gave \$100.00, which was used in advertising the Chautauqua.

The program for the 1923 session of the Chautauqua, to be held at Elon College, July 30th to August 5th, is largely arranged and the advertising begun.

Institutes.

Since April 1, 1922, institutes have been held in all Conferences. In April, 1922, Churches of the Georgia-Alabama Conference were visited in one-day institutes, and eight places in the North Carolina Conference.

In May, 1922, five institutes were held in the Valley of Virginia and ten Churches visited.

In March, 1923, thirteen institutes, two sessions in most cases, were held in Eastern Virginia, reaching thirty-three Churches. Total attendance, 1,191. Children's story hours, 212; average attendance at afternoon sessions, 32; night, 61.

In April, 1923, a number of institutes were held in the Alabama Conference. In addition, five nights were spent by the field secretary in teaching a class in the Sunday School institute held in Christian Temple, Norfolk, and three nights in leading an institute in Richmond.

Children's Day.

"Children's Day" programs prepared for 1920 and 1921 were used by a large number of schools in 1922. Offering envelopes were sent to all schools. Thirty-eight Churches responded with offerings, amounting to \$216.97.

Men and Millions Day.

In co-operation with Dr. Atkinson, Dr. Harper, and Mr. Johnson, a leaflet was prepared for "Men and Millions Day" in the Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies during January, 1923. A great number of schools observed the day. Five thousand of the leaflets were mailed to Churches requesting them for use.

Contest for 10 Per Cent Increase.

A contest for increase of 10 per cent in enrollment was held in May and June, 1922. Report cards, with a plan for 10 per cent increase, were mailed to every Sunday School in the Southern Convention. Weekly reports were requested for six weeks. Sixty-four schools responded, of which 30 reported a

10 per cent increase during the contest, or more than 10 per cent, and 27 reported an average attendance of 70 per cent or more of the enrollment; 1,111 new members were enrolled in the 64 schools reporting.

Total offerings reported, \$1,075.13. Average attendance of 64 schools for six weeks, 71 per cent of enrollment.

Office Work.

The bureau of information has been maintained, and a great deal of literature mailed out. About 850 personal letters, and 5,000 circular letters have been prepared and mailed, and 300 inquiries answered by mail, and 1,300 postal cards mailed.

Christian Sun.

Sunday School notes and Christian Endeavor notes have been furnished weekly for *The Christian Sun*, and also other material weekly.

Daily Vacation Bible Schools.

Daily Vacation Bible Schools were conducted last year at Bethlehem (Valley of Virginia), Pleasant Grove, Va. (N. C. Conference), Holland-Holy Neck (Eastern Virginia), and at the Elon Chautauqua. The field secretary co-operated in organizing, purchasing books and supplies, and assisting during the first days of all.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

1. That the Chautauqua and School of Methods at Elon College be continued under the supervision of this board, provided Convention will make financial provision, and that our Churches be urged to avail themselves of the fellowship and training offered there.

2. That we continue the services of a field secretary, and, as far as possible, that we bear the expenses of additional help of trained workers in daily vacation Bible schools.

3. That we recommend to our Churches the value of daily vacation Bible schools to our Churches, and offer our help in organizing and carrying on such schools, where such help is desired. That we also endorse "Children's Week" and urge its observance by our Churches.

4. That we advocate the continuation of the Sunday School and Christian Endeavor institutes as inaugurated by our board.

5. That we recommend that steps be taken at the 1924 session of the Southern Christian Convention for the merging of the Board of Religious Education and the Board of Education into one board, to be known as the Board of Christian Education, and that under the terms of the union the new board be required to keep a secretary in the field for Sunday School and Christian Endeavor work.

6. That we heartily commend the work being done by our field secretary, Miss Lucy M. Eldredge, and ask the hearty co-operation of our people in making our Sunday School and Christian Endeavor work more efficient.

7. That in order to maintain this department, the Southern Christian Convention donate \$1,000.00 for the coming year's work from some Convention fund, and that the board have access to the following sources of income:

8. (a) The continuation of the apportionment on Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Conventions, as follows: Alabama, \$100.00; Georgia and Alabama, \$100.00; Valley of Virginia, \$200.00; North Carolina, \$800.00; Eastern Virginia, \$800.00—total, \$2,000.00.

(b) An annual "Children's Day" offering from all Sunday Schools.

(c) The 3 per cent apportionment from "Men and Millions."

REPORT OF MISSION BOARD.

Since the Mission Board meets in annual session on or about September 15th, the fiscal year with our missionary program and appropriations begins September 1st. To make our report to the Convention perfectly clear and comprehensive; therefore, it is necessary to give appropriations made for the past year (September 1, 1921, to September 1, 1922), and those decided upon and contemplated for the present current year (September 1, 1922, to September 1, 1923).

SUNDAY SCHOOL MISSIONS.

It is gratifying indeed that our Sunday Schools, one by one, are adopting the plan worked out by this Convention and ratified by all our Sunday School Conventions of giving one offering per month for missions, one-half for home and one-half for foreign, and urge same be continued. An increasing number of schools is carrying out this program to their edification, and in most of them there is a missionary program or an address before the whole school either every Sunday or once per month. Donations from these schools, not counting Burlington and Christian Temple, because their gifts go to individuals as already named in this report, amounted the past year, from April 1, 1922, to April 1, 1923, to \$2,060.50. One-half of this amount goes to the support of our mountain work, and the other half to foreign missions, as already stated. We reiterate our abiding faith in this plan for our Sunday Schools, and have the faith that, resulting from it, we shall have in the future not only more funds for missionary purposes, but more recruits for the missionary field. The missionary emphasis must of necessity be made upon the minds of the youth, and there is no better place for this than the Sunday School.

OUR MOUNTAIN WORK.

There are at present three organized Christian Churches in Carroll County, Va., of which Rev. Elisha Bradshaw is the pastor in charge. The total membership April 1st was 34. We have one combined Church and school building at Elk Spur, which is serving a most useful purpose both for the day school, for which there are separate rooms; for Sunday School and for Sunday worship, for which there is an adequate auditorium.

There is pressing demands for another such building for our other two congregations. The land for this building has already been donated to us, and much labor and timber and assistance promised in erecting a building. We are at present maintaining two day schools, in one of which are two teachers, in the other one teacher. We have three Sunday Schools. The work is cer-

tainly a most worthy one, and the opportunity for real service is great indeed. It is doubtful if we have undertaken a Christian service which is and has been more thoroughly appreciated than among the people in Carroll County, Va.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Since our last report to this body we have finished paying the \$21,000 agreed upon with the General Convention Board for Japan, and by agreement one-half of our foreign funds will go to begin the work in China and one-half to continue the work in Japan and Porto Rico. The General Convention Board will add 20 per cent to the amount for China. We have paid out for foreign missions since our last report (April 1, 1922), \$9,281.10.

We regret to report that of the two missionaries who had volunteered to go to China, one has decided not to go at all, and the other is in doubt about his going, and so gives no definite promise at the present for the future. We are hoping and praying that the Lord will give us, at an early date in His own good time and way, workers for this important field.

We are happy to report that there are now under appointment for going out during the present year five promising missionaries, three of whom will go to Japan and two to Porto Rico. There are other volunteers for the mission field, some of whom are in our colleges preparing and are to go out as soon as equipped. During the present year a very handsome and adequate Church has been built and dedicated at Santa Isabel, Porto Rico. Rev. D. P. Barrett and wife, who are the sole representatives from this body on the foreign field, continue faithful at their post, are in good health, and are most happy at the completion of the long-needed Santa Isabel Church.

Our Burlington Christian Sunday School is to be most heartily congratulated on the zeal they display in behalf of foreign missions in the support of Miss Stacy in Japan at a salary of \$1,000 per year, and Christian Temple, Norfolk, Va., on its support of Mrs. Toshio, at a salary of \$30.00 per month in Japan, and Miss Olive Williams at a salary of \$60.00 per month in Porto Rico, and two other missionaries on the home field. We cannot commend too highly the example of these two Churches, and sincerely trust that others of our Sunday Schools will follow this lead.

"MEN AND MILLIONS."

One year ago the Convention voted for the Mission Board to assume the responsibility of carrying on the work of "Men and Millions." Since that time, through our secretary and his helpers, group meetings of ministers and captains in every district of all the Conferences have been held. With a few exceptions, every Church of the Conferences in the Convention has been visited either by the secretary himself or an assistant, and in most instances all subscribers have been visited and given an opportunity to make some payment on their pledges. All funds have been sent to Executive Secretary C. D. Johnston and accounts kept by him with the Churches. Through him, the money has been transmitted to the treasurer, C. D. West, Newport News, Va., who has handled same according to vouchers drawn and presented by Executive Secretary C. D. Johnston. Their reports give amount of moneys paid in, expenditures made, and the actual financial results achieved during the year. Independently of these reports, we have endeavored to recreate interest in the movement and in every enterprise of the Church through sermons, addresses and the printed page. The co-operation of captains in many Churches has been all that could be desired, and it is a joy to have fellowship with men and women so deeply interested in Church growth and kingdom development.

The number of tithers in the Churches has been considerably increased, though we are not prepared to give exact figures. Much of the best literature on the subject of tithing has been put into the hands of our pastors and captains, and some of it at least has reached the people directly, and many have repented.

Owing to the fact that there were two years immediately following the enlistment period during which there was no organized or constructive effort at collecting pledges, we feel that the results thus far are not to be discredited, nor are they of such character as to discourage. We have the faith to believe that those who pledged, for the most part, not only did so in good faith at the time, but will live up to that faith as their own financial conditions will allow. Almost to an individual, we have had the renewed promise that, though a longer time will be required owing to changed financial conditions, pledges will in time be paid and the obligations discharged. To this end, we must still labor, pray and pursue.

INCREASE IN MEMBERSHIP.

According to the *Annual* of this year, as compared to last, the total membership of the Churches composing the Conferences of this Convention has increased from 28,251 to 28,418; the total of 167 members. To this may be added the membership of the three congregations in Carroll County, Va. (34), making the total increase for the year of 201 members.

Report adopted as follows:

To the President and Members of the Southern Christian Convention:

As chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Christian Orphanage, Elon College, N. C., I beg to make this report for the fiscal year beginning April 1, 1922, and ending March 31, 1923.

On April 1, 1922, we had in our care eighty-three children; since that time we have admitted thirty children and have sent out twelve, leaving in our care on March 31, 1923, the end of our fiscal year, one hundred and one children—sixty boys and forty-one girls. We have thirty-eight boys, ages from two to ten years; seventeen boys, ages from ten to fifteen, and five boys, ages from fifteen to eighteen years. We have thirteen girls, ages from two to ten years; sixteen girls, ages from ten to fifteen years, and twelve girls, ages from fifteen to eighteen.

So far as handling the work in the institution is concerned, we are in good shape, as we have this number of large girls; but on the farm we only have five boys who are large enough to be of much help to us, and they are in school nine months in the year and several of them will go out when the school term ends.

We are very grateful for the loyal support of our Churches and the kindly interest that has been shown us. Our people have been liberal, considering the depression we have been going through and the many calls we have to meet.

The cotton mills have been real good to us and have been very liberal in their contributions of cloth. The fertilizer manufacturers have also been kind to us and have made contributions in fertilizer to help along in the work.

The good women of our Church have helped in a splendid spirit and have made and sent to us many little dresses for the little girls and a number of suits for the little boys, besides sheets, quilts, pillow-cases and many other articles which have been of much help in the work.

The health of the children has been exceptionally good, except in the months of January and February, when a scourge of "flu" and pneumonia struck us. We had fifty cases of "flu" and seven cases of pneumonia, but were successful in handling them, and did not lose any.

We have not been able to take all the children that made application to us, but have taken the most needy and have had to turn the others away. We could make room for thirty more, if we had ample funds to assure us that we would not get financially embarrassed.

We feel that our church has a great opportunity to do a great work of love and charity through our Orphanage. So many, many mothers have been left helpless with a family of little children and no means of support, that it is often very touching to witness their dire distress. When we think of the abounding wealth in our denomination and listen to the cry of the helpless and have to refuse their pitiful plea on account of the lack of funds, it makes us feel that our denomination is doing a small part, when it is only taking care of one hundred children.

May the day come in the near future when our people will awake to their Christian duty and make use of their opportunity in this work.

Your Committee on Finance begs leave to make the following reports:

Treasurer's Report.—Dr. W. C. Wicker, treasurer. Your committee has examined this report thoroughly and carefully, and we find the receipts correspond with the statement submitted by the Elon Banking and Trust Company.

Disbursements.—The drafts drawn by the President and Secretary of the Convention correspond with the treasurer's report. This report is absolutely correct. The balances carried forward by the treasurer's report correspond with the balances submitted by the bank's statement.

Recommendations.—We recommend that the balance to the credit of the Christian Orphanage fund (\$6.05) be paid by draft in favor of the superintendent, and account closed.

We also recommend that the overdrafts of \$200.00, drawn in favor of the Mission Board, be refunded.

Recommendation No. 3—Patron, Dr. W. W. Staley:

Whereas, the "Men and Millions" pledges will expire, except in cases where the time is extended, in 1925; and, whereas, some provision must be made to keep alive the work of the various departments of the Convention; and, whereas, this can be done more effectively by some permanent financial system; and, whereas, the membership of this Convention, after leaving out non-residents, indifferent and destitute ones, is 25,000; now, therefore,

Resolved, That the Conferences composing this Convention be requested to ask the local Churches, at the 1923 session, to pay to the Convention, annually, the sum of \$2.00 per capita, payments to begin with the 1925 annual Conferences.

Recommendation No. 1.—"That the Chautauqua and School of Methods at Elon College be continued under the supervision of this board, provided the Convention will make financial provision, and that our Churches be urged to avail themselves of the fellowship and training offered there."

Your committee decided that this recommendation was outside of their jurisdiction, as this should be referred back to the Convention to be threshed out on the floor.

Recommendation No. 7.—"In order to maintain this department, the Southern Christian Convention donate \$1,000.00 for the present year's work from the Convention fund."

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees of Elon and Bethlehem Colleges are hereby authorized to arrange for a "Library Day" in all our Churches for the benefit of the libraries of these colleges.

Whereas, a disastrous fire visited Elon College on January 18, 1923;

Whereas, no general canvass for funds to rebuild is possible, in view of pledges given during the "Men and Millions Forward Movement Campaign"; and

Whereas, every member of our brotherhood should have an opportunity to have part in a "Greater Elon Program";

Whereas, further, Bethlehem College needs additional funds in her building program; therefore, be it resolved:

First, That during the college period this summer an offering be received in every Church in cash for these colleges, and that the money so received be divided as follows: 25 per cent to Bethlehem and 75 per cent to Elon.

Second, That the Churches be urged to make this offering at least an average of \$1.00 per member.

1. We recommend that the *Annual* be printed on the same terms as last year, and we further recommend that the secretaries of the various bodies, whose proceedings are to appear in the *Annual*, shall have their minutes in the hands of the publishers by December 1, 1923.

2. That the salary of the editor of *The Christian Sun* be fixed at \$1,800.00 a year, beginning as soon as he may be relieved from pastoral work, and that he be expected to give practically his entire time to the editorial work.

3. That the respective duties of the editor and the managing editor of *The Christian Sun* shall be as follows:

The editor shall be responsible for the matter, other than advertisements, and all matter other than advertisements shall be furnished by him. The managing editor shall furnish such matter only in case the editor fails to supply sufficient copy to fill the paper.

The managing editor shall be responsible for the mechanical appearance of the paper, including proof-reading, and for the advertising matter appearing therein; and he shall conform as nearly as may be, in the make-up of the paper, to the agreement between him and the editor as to the space allotted to the respective departments. The managing editor shall not be required to publish anything which shall, in his judgment, be detrimental to the business interests of *The Christian Sun*.

That in case of failure of either party to conform to this specification of duties, complaint may, and should, be made to the Board of Publications for redress.

4. That the Convention hereby express its appreciation of the excellent paper that the editor and managing editor have given us during the past ten months, and that the Convention pledge its loyalty and hearty support to these brethren and do all in its power to increase the circulation of the paper.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM.

We rejoice to know that in some respects the morals are better and the standards of morality in this country are much higher today than they were twenty-five years or more ago. However, there is urgent need for improvement in our present moral conditions; and in many respects our standards of morality should be raised much higher than they are today. Some of the worst evils by which the Virginia Valley is afflicted today are, the very frequent violations of the prohibition laws, various forms of Sabbath desecration, the use of profane language, and the social evils or licentiousness. These and other sins such as dishonesty, lying and gossiping are not confined to those outside of the church;

but many church members are guilty of such evil practices. It is the duty of every person belonging to a church to be a real regenerated Christian and to live daily a genuine Christian life. It is also incumbent upon the older Christians to teach the young people of the Church and the unsaved people what is right and what is wrong.

It is high time for all of our people to awaken more fully to the menacing magnitude of the liquor business, and the insidious wet propaganda, and to help maintain law and order by bravely testifying to the whole truth whenever called to the witness stand, by courageously convicting the guilty when serving as jurors, and by helping to create a strong public sentiment in favor of prohibition and law enforcement.

We are pleased to note that there is an increasing interest along missionary lines in our Conference. Our pastors realize the importance of this great subject, and our Churches are feeling more keenly their responsibility of helping to carry the story of Jesus to the uttermost parts of the world. Missions is the big business of the Church, and in order that it may be well done, every Church

and every individual member of the Church should have a part in carrying out the command of our Lord, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

Therefore, your committee submits the following recommendations and suggestions:

1. That all our people pray definitely for the mission cause, our mission boards, and the great body of the Church, that there may come to us all a larger missionary vision.

2. We would suggest the importance of a definite, well-defined missionary program in each church of our conference, with an annual every-member canvass, and with a regular, systematic offering for missions.

3. We recommend systematic missionary instruction in all our Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies, together with opportunity and encouragement for definite giving to missions at least once a month.

4. We commend the work done by the Women's Missionary Societies, in our conference, and recommend that such societies and Young People's Missionary Societies be organized in all our churches, and that the pastors cooperate with the women and render them all the assistance possible in making this work a greater success.

5. We recommend a greater reading of our mission literature, as is found in *The Christian Missionary* and our church papers, also mission pamphlets and mission books, in order that we may be better informed as to the needs and progress of mission work throughout the world.

Four Churches have Woman's Missionary Societies, with a total membership of 104; six Churches have Young People's Societies, with a total membership of 184; three Churches have missionary cradle rolls, with 30 enrolled.

Miss Pattie Coghill delighted the audience with a helpful talk on "Our Mission Work."

Dr. J. O. Atkinson gave a great address on "Where Our Money Goes."

An offering was taken, amounting to \$13.75, to be divided between China and Carroll County, Va.

The goal set for this year is \$750.

The women's societies will divide their funds between China and Richmond, Va.

The young people's societies will divide their funds between Porto Rico and Carroll County, Va.

The funds from the cradle roll department will be divided between the orphanages at Sendai, Japan, and at Elon College, N. C.

THURSDAY—MORNING SESSION.

Conference called to order at 9:30 by President. Morning worship conducted by Rev. J. F. Morgan.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR.

We believe the greatest organization in the Church for the training of young people, especially young Christians, is the Christian Endeavor Society. This organization trains our people to render outspoken service to Christ along the line of tithing, prayer, Bible reading, public testimony, and a loyalty to Christ and the Church. Such an organization should have a place in every Church.

Your committee recommends, therefore:

1. The organization of a Christian Endeavor Society in every Church in our Conference.

2. The forming of a Christian Endeavor Expert class in every Christian Endeavor Society.

3. That each society co-operate with the State Christian Endeavor Union and the State district and the city C. E. Unions.

4. That where there is only part-time preaching in a Church, the Christian Endeavor Society be encouraged to hold its weekly service at the regular preaching hour, when the pastor is not present, and that the people in the community be invited to this service. This, of course, cannot take the place of the preaching service, but we believe it will be far better than no service at all, and will surely prove a great blessing to the young people, and to the community as

well, and can be made a great power in extending the cause of Christ in any Church whose pastor can be present only once or twice a month.

The Sunday School is the great educational force of the Church; therefore, we, your committee, make the following recommendations:

1. That each Church make a special effort to have at least two representatives at our Chautauqua and School of Methods at Elon College next year.
2. That during the week of the Chautauqua and School of Methods, no special services be put on at any of our Churches, so as not to interfere with the work of the Chautauqua.
3. That, if possible, every Church arrange for a daily vacation Bible school; if not convenient for one Church to hold such a school, that an effort be made to group two or more Churches together for that purpose.
4. That each Sunday School set as a goal a 10 per cent increase in membership and attendance for the approaching year.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your board has held no formal meeting this year, but have kept in touch with each other by correspondence. With the Committee of Christian Endeavor assisting, we held our second annual Sunday School-Christian Endeavor Convention at Rock Stand in April, with splendid success. We wish here to thank the Board of Religious Education of the Southern Christian Convention for sending their much-loved and efficient field secretary, Miss Lucy M. Eldredge, to our assistance in this convention. Miss Eldredge's talks were forceful and much appreciated by our people. Miss Eldredge visited a number of our Sunday Schools and made instructive talks that were well received by our people.

Our Conference covers so much territory that it is impossible to reach all our Sunday Schools with one Convention each year. In our annual Convention this year, we reached about 22 per cent. Your board decided to divide the central portion into three Sunday School districts, each member of the board to look after the interest of one district, and to hold one or more institutes in his district. This was done, and we think much good was accomplished thereby. By this system we have reached over 65 per cent.

Our North Alabama and Texas Churches being too far away to be reached by these institutes, we asked Bryant's Chapel and Liberty Grove to hold a rally in August, which they did and reported an excellent meeting. We asked the Pisgah and Sand Hill Churches to each hold a rally, but have had no report from them.

We feel like our Sunday Schools are doing reasonably good work, but the task is so great and the field so inviting that every possible effort should be put forth to strengthen our work. We, therefore, recommend:

1. That our pastors become more active in helping to train leaders for efficient service.
2. That each Sunday School organize and maintain a teacher training class.
3. That each Sunday School stress the importance of missions and evangelization.
4. That each Sunday School stress the importance of better organization and more efficient leadership.
5. That each Sunday School give one offering each month to missions and one to our Orphanage.
6. That we give our Board of Religious Education our hearty co-operation and support.

REPORT OF HOME MISSION BOARD.

Dear Brethren:

We desire to submit our report for the current year on Home Missions. It has been a very trying time on the work this year, but under the blessings of God we have been able to go forward.

Rev. J. D. Dollar has been pastor at Liberty Grove and Bryant's Chapel. Rev. J. W. Elder has served as pastor at Pisgah. They have been reasonably successful in their efforts, and we commend them for their faithful service. Our Board has co-operated with the Southern Christian Convention Board in

providing for the support of the work, and the Convention Board has agreed to make an appropriation for the work next year.

We, therefore, ask our people to rally to the support of the home mission work in North Alabama, and also that we raise next year for home missions \$250, and for Convention missions \$150.00.

We again urge our people to become interested in the cause of home missions by securing the labors of some one in the evangelistic work of our Conference, which can be done without any increased cost to the Conference.

We recommend that the Executive Committee be asked to look into this matter, and if possible take steps to carry out the plan. And in addition to the above, we deem it wise for our Home Mission Board to look after our interest in the towns and cities of our State, especially where we have members located.

After short speeches by Miss Coghill, Rev. E. W. Carter, Prof. Kernodle, Rev. H. W. Elder delivered the annual address.

R. A. Whitten presented to the Conference a gavel made from a piece of timber taken by Bro. Ollie V. Cockes, of Dendron, Va., from the old Lebanon Church, Surry County, Va., being the first Christian Church. It was here in 1794 that the name Christian was adopted, as suggested by Rev. Rice Haggard. The gavel was made by Bro. O. D. Chadwick, Girard, Ala., a deacon of Beulah Christian Church. After short addresses by R. A. Whitten and Prof. P. J. Kernodle, the gavel was accepted, and thanks given for same.

Delegates were assigned homes.

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

Since the Bible is the Word of God, and our rule of faith and practice, besides the source of all literature, we recommend and heartily urge its daily, careful and prayerful reading in every home.

We find that only a few of our people in this Conference are taking *The Christian Sun*, and we believe that if our folks, that are not already subscribers,

could just know what a valuable and splendid paper it is, and could realize how much help and inspiration it would afford each member of the family, that no home within our bounds would be without its weekly visits.

We, therefore, strongly urge that some one in every home subscribe for it now, and we call attention to the fact that we are not loyal to our Church unless we support our own paper; neither can we be informed of the progress and doings of our Church as a whole unless we read our paper. It is truly the greatest source of learning about our work, and a very effectual means of spreading the gospel of our Lord.

We further recommend that our people subscribe for *The Herald of Gospel Liberty*, the oldest religious publication in the world, and the official organ of the General Christian Convention of the Christian Church.

We further recommend that our ladies subscribe for *The Christian Missionary*, a monthly publication of our own, which will prove a great help in the woman's work of the Church.

We recommend that our people use discretion in the selection of books and periodicals for their homes, and that we give great care and prayerful attention to literature, both books and papers of every kind, that our children shall read. Let us be sure that they will read something, and may we see that they read well, and read things that will strengthen Christian character, for many books and tracts, even under the guise of religious literature, would not only weaken, but destroy, the very foundation of Christian character.

We, therefore, recommend that this body take steps to have a convention held some time during the next year, and that each school organize a teacher training class and maintain it through the year, and see that each school is represented at the convention when held.

We recommend that all of our Sunday Schools in this Conference give at least one Sunday of each month's offering to our Orphanage at Elon College.

Let us take an active part in supporting them, and help them in the enforcement of law and order, that they might not be cowards on the job, but men that are worth while on the job, looking after the welfare of our land and homes, and that our children may have peace and safety and good influences surrounding them.

That we stand against the things that lead our people away from Church on Sunday, and plead with them to remain at Church and let us give them something that will make them want to stay under the influence of the Church.

HOM EMISSION REPORT.

Your committee would report the following: Jesus, in explaining the parable of the sower, said the field is the world. For convenience, we use the word home and foreign missions. The home field is where we get the supplies in men and money for the foreign field. If the foreign work is to grow and expand, it is imperative that the home field must also grow. The Christian Church in Georgia and Alabama has had a continual loss by not going to the cities. Take the larger cities of these States and we have hundreds of members from our rural Churches to go, and they have been lost to us—to the Christian Church. We have in the city of Atlanta, Ga., plenty of members to constitute a Church—a large Church—but we have not looked after them. The same is true in other cities. We ought to have Churches in Waycross, Savannah, Macon, Cordele, Fitzgerald, Thomasville, Moultrie, Douglas, Dawson, and Albany; in fact, we have many members in all these towns, besides many other points in Georgia. There are two outstanding needs—men and money. We must enter the cities as fast as we can to stop this leakage in our work. We need a larger faith, so we would not be afraid to undertake a larger task for developing the Church.

We, therefore, recommend that we elect a Home Mission Board of three members—one for one year, one for two years, and one for three years. The President of the Conference to be an ex officio member of the board. That this board be empowered to look after the mission interest of the Conference and report annually their doings.

I have written numerous letters and sent little booklets, "How to Begin and Carry on a Young People's Society," which I received from Dr. Atkinson, to various Churches of this Conference, and have written them regarding organization of young people's societies.

I have heard from only three of these, two of which say that they do not have enough young people to organize, which I know is true in some cases. I trust that all that may have started a society.

I am afraid that we, as a whole, do not stress missions enough in our Churches, and we feel that the only way to make the mission spirit grow as it should is to enlist our young people in the work.

Therefore, I recommend first that we, as individual Churches, get the complete co-operation of our pastors, and together undertake this organization, if there is any available material.

Second, that where we cannot have this organization that we strengthen our Christian Endeavor, and have a good missionary committee that we might get in the mission work along with the C. E. Society.

If there is any Churches without either a young people's missionary society or Christian Endeavor, that, by all means, we, if possible, organize a C. E. Society, with a good missionary committee.

Our goal for this year was \$100 and ten societies, and I am very sorry that we are so short of this goal. I trust that there will be other societies that will be heard from later, from which I have not heard. Mrs. J. B. Hammond, of Enigma, Ga., writes that they have a good society there, of which we are all very proud. I hand you herewith her check for dues from her society, \$13.29.

DEPARTMENT OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION.

To the Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavors of Georgia and Alabama Conference, in session Vanceville, October 23-24-25, 1923:

Because I regret that it is impossible for me to meet with you this year, may I extend this word of greeting to all of you, who have been such an inspiration in our work. For myself and the Board of Religious Education, I express appreciation for your good work, and best wishes for the continuance of progress along Sunday School and Christian Endeavor lines. A good Sunday School in every Church is a necessity, and more and more our Christian Churches are coming to see the great value of linking with that Sunday School a Christian Endeavor Society which will bring spiritual strength and training in Christian service to our young people. The children and youth of every Conference are too precious possessions to neglect. They are our future leaders in Church, as well as in the nation, and so the future depends very much upon how they are trained. That they grow up with Christian ideals and with a love for Jesus Christ in their hearts which will guide their daily actions, should be our supreme aim as Sunday School teachers or as parents in the home, or as workers with boys and girls through every channel.

Throughout all the work of the Church, the need of leaders who are consecrated, faithful and trained is very great. As the secretary of your Board of Religious Education, may I urge that every Sunday School and Christian Endeavor worker take advantage of every opportunity possible, to come to know better how to do the great work for which we are responsible. Teacher-training classes in the local Churches are helping meet this need. Institutes with groups of Churches, as held in the Alabama Conference this past year, give an opportunity for inspiration and interchange of ideas which is most helpful. Those who attended your Sunday School Convention in 1922, I am sure will testify that it brought messages which were instructive and inspiring.

We hope that some methods may be found by which this may be a permanent feature of your work. The Chautauqua and School of Methods, held at Elon College, has been very effective, and your representatives would be most welcome there. A similar assembly at Bethlehem College has been suggested, and it is hoped may be held in the near future, which would offer to Sunday School teachers and Christian workers and pastors an opportunity to come together for a week each year to really study with competent teachers the work they are now striving so earnestly to do. This would mean better Sunday Schools, and more active Christian Endeavor societies, which would lead to Churches winning men and women and boys and girls, not only to membership in the Church, but really and truly to Jesus Christ, and this is the supreme goal of all our work.

In any work which you plan to do, the Board of Religious Education stands ready to co-operate to the fullest extent possible. The board, through its field secretary, is your servant. Its services are yours for local Churches, or Conference work, to help in every way possible. Working together, may the coming year be made the best of all in our history as a Christian Church in Georgia.

Report of Committee on Home Missions was read by Col. J. E. West, Chairman, and adopted as follows:

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

At the last session of the Conference, the matter of appropriating \$200.00 to the work among prisoners was referred to our committee, which made the appropriation. As to future appropriations to this work, we recommend that the sum of \$200 be deducted from the total Conference collections by the Committee on Finance, and that the remainder be distributed on the usual percentage basis.

We urge the prompt payment of pledges to the Men and Millions Movement.

We urge our pastors and delegates to see that Conference assessments are paid in full.

While no new Church has been admitted this year, we rejoice that the magnificent Christian Church in Richmond, Va., was opened for service on Sunday, September 30, 1923. We bespeak for that Church our continued support and co-operation.

Recognizing the pressing need at South Norfolk Church for better equipment, we endorse the proposed plan of building an adequate brick Sunday School building so designed that the Church auditorium can be economically added at a later date, and for this purpose we recommend a total appropriation of \$2,500, payable in annual installments of \$500 each. We further recommend that the Treasurer of the Conference place at interest the first \$500 appropriation for the benefit of the South Norfolk Church, and pay same over to the treasurer of said Church when work begins on the new building.

We recommend the usual appropriation of \$1,000 to the Christian Temple on building fund.

If any funds remain after these appropriations are paid, we recommend that the application of the Richmond Church be considered by this committee.

SECOND DAY—FORENOON SESSION.

Conference met and called to order at 10 o'clock. Devotions conducted by Dr. R. C. Helfenstein. Subject: "The Beauty and Power of Genuine Goodness."

The report on foreign missions was read by Rev. W. L. Wells and adopted, as follows:

FOREIGN MISSION REPORT.

We rejoice in the fact that during the past year our work in the foreign mission fields has made commendable progress, and we have many reasons to take courage and press on in the most worthy cause of doing our part in world evangelization.

Since our last Conference, five new workers have been sent out by our Foreign Mission Board, namely: Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Borton, who are in Porto Rico, to carry on agricultural and other forms of industrial mission work; Mr. G. Sano, who is now doing splendid work at Ichinoseki, Japan, after twelve years' preparation in the United States; Mr. Victor Rivera, a graduate of Elon College, who is in Porto Rico as our Sunday School and Christian Endeavor specialist; and Miss Angie Crew, who just recently reached Japan, where she plans to prepare for work among children, as there is a large field being opened along that line.

The splendid new Santa Isabel Chapel, in Santa Isabel, P. R., was dedicated September 7th. It is a modern Sunday School and Church building, and for its size is one of the finest on the island. It cost approximately \$13,000, upon which we have an indebtedness of about three thousand dollars, which we hope will be paid off at some early date.

Another combination parsonage-preaching place was dedicated during the past year at Narugo, a large health resort in the northern, or Sendai, field, at a cost of about \$2,500. The pastor in charge is doing excellent work in this field, and it is of interest to note that he was supported during his theological training by the Christian Endeavor Society of our Suffolk Church. Since becoming a regular pastor, his salary has been increased to \$540 a year, so that the society could not continue his support.

At Moka, in the middle, or the Utsunomiya field, a property was bought during this past year, and is now arranged with a parsonage for the pastor and a combined kindergarten-Church building, at the total cost of about \$2,500. This gives us an excellent plant, with a pastor in charge and with a fine kindergarten, doing excellent work.

We have also purchased a strip of land in Porto Rico to enlarge the premises where Brother and Sister Barrett live, and negotiations are now on for the purchase of a lot next to the Church in Avus for a parsonage there.

In Porto Rico each of the four main stations have shown commendable progress, not only in converts won, but in moving toward self-support by the native Church.

In Japan, we have taken a larger part in a great work called "newspaper evangelism," the same being interdenominational, our missionary, Rev. W. Q. McKnight, having charge of the northern branch at Sendai. We have also

had Dr. Woodworth teaching in the theological school in which several denominations are working together and in which we have several students preparing for the ministry. We also have two young Japanese ladies completing their work in the kindergarten training school, and one Bible woman completing her course and planning to take an extra year of special training.

We have two kindergartens in Porto Rico, and five in Japan, in addition to which there are several mothers' societies and sewing classes for girls. This is all in addition to our regular work of preaching and teaching and personal soul-winning, which continues throughout the year in various ways.

The Japan earthquake has upset our plans very much. It is reported that our large mission home and largest Tokyo Church have suffered most severely, and it is also reported that work on the new mission home which had just begun could not continue. This means that our whole building program in Tokyo is, for the time being, side-tracked.

Our Foreign Mission Board has recently issued a series of leaflets containing biographical sketches of all our missionaries, both home and foreign. These are especially good, as they are right up to date.

Your committee would urge:

First, that prayer be made for our foreign missionaries, that they may have great success in their respective fields of labor.

Second, that our home people may catch a vision of the great need of the gospel in heathen lands, and that God may lay it upon the hearts of many of our young people to carry out the great commission of our Lord, "Go ye into all the world and make disciples of all nations."

We urge further that all who can, pay up their pledges to Men and Millions at their earliest convenience, so as to have available funds to meet our outstanding obligations in the mission fields; that more of our people subscribe to and read *The Christian Missionary*, in order that we may keep ourselves posted as to the work that our denomination is doing in the foreign fields.

Report of Committee on Education was read by Dr. C. H. Rowland, and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

There has never been such interest in education as at the present time. States are erecting buildings, increasing salaries, and demanding fuller attendance. Colleges and universities are multiplying their facilities, faculties, endowments, and student bodies. If knowledge could save men and the State, America would be safe, and the Church would be true. It must, however, be a lesson for the world, that the most learned nation of all time is now pitiful in her need. Greece shines no more, though her classics are still models for schools.

Elon College is our pride and our care. The fire of January 18, 1923, did not consume the loyalty of our people, nor the hope of our Church. Though the main building, with all the records of thirty-three years, perished in the flames, liberal individuals and communities rallied to the help of the institution, and five splendid buildings are in course of construction. The Alamance building is now occupied by daily activity, and four other buildings made possible by J. M. Darden, P. J. Carlton, M. Orban, Jr., and the Dukes, giving fifty thousand dollars each, are rising sphinx-like out of the ruins of the great fire, and Elon's future is brighter than ever before.

It remains, now, for the members of the Church to send their sons and daughters to Elon, which stands for "character first and always." The adoption of this report will mean the endorsement of Elon College as the best expression of our educational program.

The committee has no special report to make on H. C. Hainer, Revs. Dennis F. Parsons, J. T. Harrod, J. B. Chadwick, and J. N. Cutchin, as they have not communicated directly with the committee during the year.

We submit the following recommendations:

1. That Rev. H. S. Hardcastle be received into this Conference upon a letter of transfer from the North Carolina Christian Conference.
2. That Rev. Herman C. Taylor, a licentiate of this Conference, be ordained as an elder during this session, upon the recommendation of the People's Church, Dover, Del.
3. That Rev. T. Fred Wright, now a student in Elon College, be granted a loan of three hundred dollars (\$300) to assist him during the present scholastic year.

Address, "Joy in the Ministry," by Dr. C. H. Rowland.

It was moved and carried that our colleges be requested to require all applicants for admission as ministerial students from this Conference to be endorsed by the Committee on Education of the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference.

On motion, the Committee on Education was instructed to consider the advisability of ordaining Licentiate J. N. Cutchin.

Report on moral reform was read by Rev. W. B. Fuller, and, on motion, adopted as follows:

REPORT ON MORAL REFORM.

We are living in an age that offers the greatest opportunity to the Church that the world has ever known. The world today has more young people and children than ever before. Of course, young people and children want life and activity. They are going to have it. If the Church will use her opportunity, and win the boys and girls to Christ, the mainspring of vitality will be turned in the right direction, the Church will be better loved and supported, and the powers of darkness driven back.

True love is of the heart, not the head. If we can, through Bible reading, prayer, example, personal effort and consecration, get the children and youth to give their heart to Jesus and love Him who is worthy of their love, more than the sins of the world, then moral reform will take care of itself. The wise man said: "My son, give me thine heart." If God gets the heart surrendered unto Him, the rest of the body will take care of itself. Sin will not be the dominating force in such a life.

We recommend:

1. That our parents and Church leaders study conditions and also methods of instilling high ideals in the minds and hearts of the boys and girls, and to endeavor to make home the most sacred spot on earth. Thus preparing for a citizenship, which shall be Christian in thought and deed, and solve many of our problems in the Jesus way. Especially do we urge the value of the family altar in every home, with its daily uplifting and safeguarding influences, and the responsibilities which the Church must share with the home, of teaching the child the truths of the Word of God in such a way that these truths will inspire and guide his daily life.

2. That our Churches come to realize more fully that they are here to live among men and to serve them, as did the Master, and that to minister to the whole life, the social side must not be overlooked, but the Church devote thought to offering opportunities for Christian and social life to its young people.

3. That the Churches continue an active campaign against the evils of the liquor traffic, and that the members, in every way possible, exert their influence against attempts to weaken the Volstead act, and to electing to office officials who will stand for righteousness and law enforcement.

4. That we, as followers of Christ, strive to live closer to Him, and that our attitude to moral conditions of our time be determined by the study of His life and His Father's word, and that our attitude shall be expressed not only in condemnation, but in conscientious effort to help improve conditions in our community, State and nation.

SECOND DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference called to order at 2 o'clock. Devotions led by Rev. J. M. Roberts.

Dr. J. W. Wellons was introduced to the Conference, and after some remarks by him the congregation gave an offering, amounting to \$40.84, to defray his expenses.

Report of Woman's Board was read by Mrs. C. H. Rowland, and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF WOMAN'S BOARD.

The woman's work of this Conference during the past year has been along the same general lines as heretofore. Though we have not accomplished all that we had hoped for, we have endeavored to encourage mission study, organize societies where there were none, and to increase a larger interest in the work in general.

We held four group meetings during the spring, at each of which there was a good attendance and inspiring missionary messages. Our annual Conference was with the society at Wakefield, and the representation and reports were both fine. The total amount gathered through all our societies was \$5,462.

For the ensuing year, our financial goal is \$5,500. Our objectives are the Richmond Church, the mountain field and the Santa Isabel work. We have

never wavered in our ideal of reaching the women and young people in every Church in our Conference, and we commit ourselves to the support of our Men and Millions campaign in our Churches. The following officers are submitted for your approval:

President appointed ordaining presbytery—C. H. Rowland, L. E. Smith, J. P. Barrett.

The following resolution, offered by Judge J. F. West, was adopted:

Resolved, That the Circuit Court of Surry County, Va., be requested to appoint E. E. Holland, W. W. Staley, Jesse E. Harrell, J. P. Lee and A. T. Holland trustees of the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference, to hold for the Conference the legal title to the lot of land near Surry Courthouse, Va., on which was located "Old Lebanon" Christian Church, in which, on August 4, 1794, the name "Christian" was adopted.

Report of Christian education was read by Rev. James H. Lightbourne, Chairman, and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

Your Committee on Christian Education has endeavored to work with, and to carry out the plans of, the Board of Religious Education of the Southern Christian Convention and the Department of Christian Education of the General Convention. By a happy coincidence, the chairman of your committee is the executive secretary of the Convention of Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies of the Conference, and consequently there has been a delightful and effective spirit of co-operation between these two bodies.

Your committee early communicated with Miss Lucy M. Eldredge, field secretary of the Southern Convention Board, and Dr. W. A. Harper, secretary of the General Convention Department. The former, a member, as it happens, of this committee, advised us the board would call on us from time to time, and that the board would always be at our service. The latter suggested: first, the correlating of the Young People's Division of the Sunday School—that is, ages 12 to 24—with the Christian Endeavor; and, second, the holding of a series of one or two-day institutes with groups of Churches of the Conference.

We wish to report that the Board of the Southern Convention, from time to time, did call upon us, and that whenever we found occasion to call upon it, the response was prompt and agreeable.

The first suggestion of Dr. Harper's presented grave difficulties. In the first place, few of our schools are closely or departmentally graded, and consequently few have a superintendent of the Young People's Division. In the second place, we have only a very small number of Christian Endeavor Societies, and there exists a woeful lack of contact with the few existing effective organizations. To meet these difficulties, special emphasis has been given graded organization in our Sunday Schools. The revised Convention Constitution calls for a complete staff of departmental secretaries.

The Sunday School Convention of the previous July had sounded a note of constructive effort in behalf of Christian Endeavor. A secretaryship of Christian Endeavor was established, and Mrs. C. C. Rawls, of Suffolk, was

appointed to the office. At the 1923 Convention, Christian Endeavor was given a representative place on the program, including two one-hour conferences, a period for a pageant, and in the revised Constitution an equal rank with the Sunday School in the name of the Convention. Mr. W. H. Baker, of Newport News, a State Endeavor official, is the newly elected secretary, and since the July Convention three new societies have been organized, one an intermediate.

The second suggestion was apt, for the Convention, with the Southern Convention Board, was planning such a campaign of institutes. They were held during the period March 17th to April 2nd, with the following faculty: Miss Lucy Eldredge, Mr. Hermon Eldredge, and Rev. E. B. Flory. It was planned to have Christian Endeavor represented in these institutes in the person of Mr. Frank Wilson, field secretary for North Carolina and Virginia, but a week before the institutes he was forced to cancel the engagement.

Twenty-four institute sessions were held with thirteen groups, sixteen special meetings were held with ten Churches, and one hundred and eighty children attended six story hours. In the afternoon, institute sessions, 417 Sunday School superintendents, officers and teachers were directly reached. The institutes financed themselves.

Upon the chairman's request for suggestions from the membership of the committee relative to possible channels of activity, Dr. R. C. Helfenstein, of Dover, Del., suggested a questionnaire on the basic principles of the Christian religion for use among the teen-age students of our Sunday Schools. The chairman requested each member of the committee, together with Dr. W. A. Harper, to submit fifteen questions. From the seventy-five thus secured, no two identical, the chairman created the following questionnaire of twelve questions, the student being urged to answer ten of the twelve.

1. Why do you believe there is a God?
2. What is the Bible?
3. Who was Jesus Christ, and what about Him especially appeals to you.
4. How do we become Christians?
5. What are some of the obligations of Church membership?
6. What is prayer?
7. What is sin?
8. What is faith?
9. For whom and for what was the Sabbath established?
10. Name as many as you can of the principles of the Christian Church.
11. What is the Holy Spirit?
12. What differences can you give between Protestantism and Catholicism?

At first reading, these questions appear involved and beyond the grasp of the comprehension of a teen-age girl or boy. But closer observation reveals they are what they were intended to be—questions on the basic principles of Christianity.

Our teen-age girls and boys did what we wanted them to do—they answered the questionnaire as best they could, and they answered it well.

Twenty-three of thirty-nine schools approached through their superintendents requested the questionnaires, and seventeen of these schools returned them to the committee. The following observations drawn from a study of the results by age groups are interesting, instructive and constructive:

1. Our young people, either in their homes or their Churches, or in both, are being effectively instructed in the basic principles of Christianity.
2. Even scholars so young as ten years attempted and, in the main, could answer ten of the twelve questions.
3. More stress apparently has been laid on the obligations of Church membership than on several of the essential principles on which Church membership necessarily must be based.
4. On the whole, there was a vagueness in regard to what constitutes faith.
5. Few attempted to define the Holy Spirit.
6. Very few could name the principles of the Christian Church.

Some one has said: "It is one thing to be a Christian, and quite another to know what Christianity is." We understand Christian education to be the effort of the Church, through every available agency and channel, but more especially through the home, the Sunday School, the Christian Endeavor, and the missionary societies, to teach what Christianity is. It is not to teach ethics, nor morality, nor social service, but to teach the essentials of Christianity, that these might work out in ethics, in morality, and in social service. We are very mindful of Paul—"Work out your own salvation, for it is God that worketh in you."

Another has said: "It is apparently quite possible for one to go to Sunday School and Church considerably without ever gaining a clear conception of what Christianity is." The investigations by groups of chaplains and Y. M. C. A. religious secretaries a few years ago in the armies of England and the United States bear out the truth of this. One report reads: "We find astonishing, lamentable, universal ignorance concerning the facts and truths of Christianity." It is to remedy such a condition we emphasize the necessity of Christian education. The Church of the Reformation was a teaching Church, and we have got to become again more and more a careful and thorough teaching Church.

We wish to make the following suggestions:

1. That our pastors, from time to time, preach on—
The religious truths of the Old Testament.

The teachings of Jesus.

Paul's interpretation of the life, the death and the resurrection of the Christ.

The history of the Church.

The principles of the Christian Church.

2. That our Sunday Schools have brought before them from time to time—

The history of the Church.

The history of missions.

The great essential truths.

The principles of the Christian Church.

We wish to recommend:

1. That the Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Societies of our Conference manifest a greater interest in the Convention organized and carried on in their behalf.

2. That our Sunday Schools give considerable thought to the advantages of grading and of using graded literature.

3. That our Sunday Schools conduct daily vacation Bible schools.

4. That where it is practicable, our Churches promote and support the Virginia system of public school Bible study.

5. That we endorse the request of the Board of Religious Education of the Southern Convention for the "Children's Day" offering from our schools, and that we urge the promotion of the offering.

6. That our Churches conduct classes in leadership training, especially teacher training.

7. That our pastors take more active part in the Sunday School, informing themselves and instructing the Sunday School leaders in methods, organization, and worship.

8. That until the Southern Convention takes some action, the Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies of our Conference support, as an emergency, the Department of Christian Education of the General Convention with one Sunday's offering each year, preferably the offering received on Rally Day. (This item referred to Executive Committee, S. C. C., for favorable consideration.—Secretary.)

9. That our Sunday Schools, Christian Endeavor Societies, and missionary societies endeavor to be represented at the Elon Chautauqua and School of Methods.

10. That the Executive Board of the Convention of Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies, and two members at large, to be appointed by the President, constitute the Conference Committee on Christian Education.

11. That we, as a Conference, endorse the plans and suggestions of the General Convention Department of Christian Education for a program of Christian education for our denomination.

Since "reading maketh a full man," we urge, therefore, that the Bible be read in every home daily; and that prayer be made to God to the end that the Holy Spirit interpret to our hearts the life-giving Word as we read it.

We recommend *The Christian Sun*, *The Herald of Gospel Liberty*, *The Christian Missionary*, and *The Journal of Christian Education* to our people as a means to a great end, namely: that our people may keep themselves informed as to the needs and progress of the work in the kingdom—as allotted to our care.

6. That each pastor read and bring this report before each congregation once during the coming year, and stress the importance of reading and studying our own literature.

REPORT ON MORAL REFORM.

There is a strong tide of immorality that should claim the attention of the Church. It is against God. It is against the Bible. It is against the Church. It is against authority. It is against morality. It has gathered force so rapidly that it almost staggers one to contemplate the power of its surging waves. May we call the attention of the Conference to a few of these waves.

1. Complete returns from twenty-one States show an increase of 35 per cent in the number of divorces registered in 1922, as compared with divorces in 1916. At the same time, in the same twenty-one States, marriages have increased only 7 per cent. The number of divorces registered in these States in 1922 totaled 61,073, compared with 45,181 in 1916. The rate of divorce in these twenty-one States jumped from one divorce to 9.2 marriages in 1916, to one divorce to 7.2 marriages in 1922.

It is computed by the *Troy Times* that divorces are granted in America at the rate of one every four minutes throughout the year.

Since the home is the unit of our society, these figures should cause us serious consideration. What we need is a new tradition that marriage is binding. Our grandparents did not always agree, but divorce was not well thought of in their time; besides, their economic existence depended on each one staying on the job—the one to cut the wood, the other to bake the bread.

The nation, we are told, "is really founded on its family life and preserved by the influences that radiate from its homes." From the day it was founded, it has drawn its inspiration and its vitality from its family altars, but now it is only a step from the altar to the divorce court.

2. The increase of Sabbath desecration, too, should receive our most earnest consideration. With more than 200,000 automobiles in this State, conservative observation would justify us to estimate that, at least, one-half of these are used for other than right purposes each holy Sabbath day. Estimating four people to the car, we have the great throng of 400,000 people who are desecrating the Sabbath themselves, and who lead thousands of others to do so by keeping open stores, filling station, etc.

3. The cigarette habit, awhile ago, was confined to the youthful boys of our land, but today it is not only more commonly practiced by the youthful boys, but our fathers, some mothers and many daughters are puffing away at the cigarette, too. Our highest medical authorities agree with the observation of all world leaders that the cigarette has a most telling influence on the physical as well as the moral man. Out of one hundred young criminals in one test, there were ninety-seven cigarette smokers.

4. Modern pleasure-seekers are more and more prone to engage in such pastime and recreation as shall appeal to their emotional natures, and too often are led to surrender that that is purest and best in life. Among these we would name the modern dance, the theater, moving-picture shows, and the bathing pool. We had read a prophecy of such a tide, but here it is. What can we do? Can the tide be diverted? We must do something. The Church should sound the alarm. She is God's watchman. We must urge all of God's prophets, preachers and lay leaders to lay off with the fairy tales, pretty poems, essays on art and travel, quit so much talk about little Willie, who has gone to heaven, moonshine on mother's grave, and tell Aunt Mary I'll be there—but describe the state of the heart, character of life, the peril of the soul, the claims of Jesus Christ, and sound out the story of the cross.

We must recognize fully that every man and woman who denies God's word, whether in the Church or in the world, is an enemy, and we must reprove, rebuke and warn as we see the day approaching.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

Education is the process of modifying human experience by guiding conduct. In this educative process the purposes of the individual must be realized. Christian education seeks to center the conduct and character, the plans and purposes about Christ as the ideal of our highest conception of what man should become.

Since our last annual Conference, Elon College has suffered a tremendous loss in the burning of the administration building, library, records, equipment, and all other contents; but our college had so endeared itself to the Church and the public mind that Alamance County responded by raising \$100,000 to build the Alamance Hall. Three friends of the Church each gave \$50,000 for three new additional buildings, and a science building, at a cost of \$50,000, is being built by the gifts of the brotherhood at large. The present building program provides for five new fire-proof buildings, at a cost of \$300,000. This

will provide as good accommodations for the education of the young people of our Church as they can find in any institution in the country.

We urge all our people to use their undivided influence to enlarge the patronage of the college and to give it their financial support in paying all present pledges and making further donations to the endowment fund. We further urge our people to make donations of books for the library, or money to purchase books.

We have examined Licentiates J. Fuller Johnson and M. T. Sorrell on their proficiency for ordination, and recommend that they be ordained as elders in this Conference during the present session of Conference.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Church's great mission is to evangelize the world. "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature," is a command as imperative as when the departing Master gave it to His disciples. The Master's plan included all the peoples of the earth.

If the Church is to succeed in giving the gospel to all the people, a new emphasis must be put on the importance of strengthening and enlarging our work in the home field.

This work may be designated as intensive and extensive. Every local Church should aim to reach for active service for Christ and the Church, all the people of the community. On the other hand, we should ever be seeking new fields of service. These may be found in the growing towns and cities and in the neglected rural districts.

Whether the home mission work be considered from the standpoint of the local Church or from that of the fields beyond, everywhere fields are "white already to harvest." Never was the responsibility greater, nor the opportunity more challenging. It is a challenge to our closest co-operation and most earnest endeavor. Whether this challenge comes from the nearby field or from beyond, we should accept it with an earnest endeavor to do our full duty.

We recommend that all money collected by the Eastern North Carolina Christian Conference for home missions be turned over to the Treasurer of the North Carolina Christian Conference.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The first and chief business of the Church is to be missionary. The power, progress and development of all Church interests and enterprises depend upon the missionary spirit. We grow strong in all other interests that pertain to

the Church only as we grow strong in our missionary endeavor. As a people, we have not shown that zeal for the spread of the gospel that we should show. However, we are showing an ever-increasing interest in missions, as results show. We have sent out five missionaries during the past year—two to Porto Rico and three to Japan. In Porto Rico, more than 70,000 souls have been assigned us as a Church, and unless we reach these people with the gospel, they will not be reached. In Japan, 400,000 souls have been apportioned us, and these will not be reached with the gospel unless we as a Church reach them. We learn with sorrow of the great loss of life and property among our people in Japan because of the recent earthquake. There is great and widespread want and destitution among our Churches and people in Japan, and it will require large sums of money to restore the work to its former condition.

We recommend:

1. That we pray earnestly to God to give us missionaries—ambassadors—to go out on the firing line for us.

2. That we make our foreign mission offering equal to our home mission offering.

3. That we take a Christmas offering in all our Churches and Sunday Schools for missions, and this offering this year be made as liberal as possible, in view of the great destitution and need in Japan; and that the Christmas offering for missions go one-half to home and the other half to foreign missions.

In view of considerable dissatisfaction among the Churches regarding the apportionment, we recommend a decrease of 20 per cent in the amount apportioned to each Church the past year.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR.

Your Committee on Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor rejoice to report progress in these two departments of the Church.

Since the consolidation of the three Conferences, we have made a gain of nine Sunday Schools and 2,927 added to the enrollment. While the Christian Endeavor has increased in both about 300 per cent.

Five years ago today (October 25, 1918), the Board of Religious Education, an organization authorized by the Southern Christian Convention, held its first session in Raleigh, N. C., and set for its goal—

First—A Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Society in every Church in the Southern Christian Convention.

Second—Every school a standard school, and every society a standard society.

Third—Monthly missionary instruction and offering.

Fourth—Raise the sum of one thousand dollars for Sunday School and Christian Endeavor missions during the year.

While we have not yet reached this goal, or gained in numbers as rapidly as we would like to report, yet it is encouraging to note the great and good work that is being done by this board, and to witness the increasing zeal, determination and enthusiasm for the work as evidenced by our last Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Convention held at Catawba Springs, July 11-13.

Miss Lucy M. Eldredge, our field secretary, began active service in July, 1921, and since that time has been faithful to her duties of organizing new Sunday Schools, Christian Endeavor Societies, holding institutes, editing religious education notes in *The Christian Sun*, and maintaining an office in Richmond, Va., where information regarding any phase of Sunday School or Christian Endeavor work is gladly furnished to any school or society. We, therefore, recommend—

First—That the Eastern North Carolina Conference, in session assembled, being an integral part and vitally interested in the work of its young people, pledge its loyalty to the Board of Religious Education and donate from its Conference funds not less than \$200 each year for the purpose of carrying forward this great and important work.

Second—That Sunday School and Christian Endeavor institutes be held in as many communities as possible in the bounds of this Conference during the coming year, under the direction of the Board of Religious Education, and that every Church co-operate with its secretary, Miss Eldredge, in making them a success.

Third—That we urge upon each school and society the importance of reaching the "standard of efficiency" as set forth by the Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Boards of our Church, keeping posted and abreast of the times by subscribing to and reading our Church papers, and using, as far as practicable, the literature published by our own denomination.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

The day in which we live is emphasizing education as never before in the history of our country. This is commendable, and indicates a wholesome tendency or trend in our American life. While this emphasis upon education is to be commended, it should be borne in mind that it is not merely education that we need, but Christian education; not merely education for a livelihood, but education for life and service to God and man. If the future of our citizens and sacred institutions are to be safeguarded and fostered, developed along safe and sane lines, we must look well to the education not only of the head and hand, but of the heart as well. It is indispensable that education be built around and upon the principles of the Master Teacher.

On the 18th day of January of this year, Elon College suffered a great calamity in the loss by fire of the administration building of that institution, the parent building of the college, which fire entailed a loss of thousands of dollars in property values, to say nothing of the inestimable loss of records, portraits and other valuables that cannot be duplicated. The information of this loss spread as a cloud of sorrow over the hearts of our people, both North and South. This sorrow, however, was the birth of a new love and hope for the college, and the occasion of a determination to rebuild in a larger and more substantial way. Consequently, out of the ashes and upon the ruins of the old, a new, larger, more commanding Elon is rising rapidly and surely today. Five splendid, commodious, well-appointed buildings are now under construction in place of the one building that was destroyed, these buildings being the gifts of generous hearts who love the cause of Christian education and the Christian Church. The future of the college is one of great hope and promise.

On the 12th day of September, Bethlehem Junior Christian College, Wadley, Ala., opened her doors for the first time for the reception of students, thus bringing to a happy realization the hopes and dreams of our people of the Far South for an educational institution of our Church in their midst. This school has made a good beginning, and promises much for our work in that section.

At the session of the American Christian Convention, in Burlington, in October, 1922, the educational work of our Church was co-ordinated under the

Board of Christian Education, with a general secretary of education. This, we feel, is a great step forward, and will be productive of larger things for the denomination and for the kingdom in the years that lie ahead.

We call attention of the Conference to the following items for consideration:

1. Licentiate J. M. Allred has been actively engaged in the work of the Church during the year, having served a pastorate of four Churches. Three of these Churches have presented written requests for his ordination. After careful examination, we recommend that he be ordained during the sitting of this Conference.

2. Licentiate E. C. Brady has made no report to your committee.

3. W. B. Terrell is a junior in Elon College this year, and is making commendable progress in his work. It is understood that he is in need of financial assistance, but has no request before the committee. We recommend him to the Executive Committee for such action as may be necessary.

4. We prayerfully urge upon the membership of Conference a loyal, undivided support of Elon College, the Department of Christian Education, and of all those agencies that look toward a better-trained leadership and a more efficient Church for Christ-like service in the world.

5. That any Church failing to secure pastoral services apply to Dr. J. O. Atkinson, secretary of missions of the Southern Christian Convention.

1. That our pastors and Church officials make a definite and determined effort during the coming year to get every home in the Church to agree to read a chapter or a selection from the Bible once a day.

2. That we heartily endorse *The Christian Sun*, the official organ of the in each Church to assist our managing editor in securing new subscribers and Southern Christian Convention, and urge that some definite plan be adopted renewals.

3. That we endorse *The Herald of Gospel Liberty*, the official organ of the American Christian Convention, and *The Christian Missionary*, the official organ of our Mission Board.

4. That the editors of our Church papers be requested to do all in their power to create a sentiment in favor of the reading of the Bible in all our public schools and other State institutions, and the teaching of the basic principles of Christianity in these institutions.

5. That a special effort be made by our pastors, Church and Sunday School officials during the coming year to get all our Sunday Schools, not now doing so, to use our own Sunday School literature.

We know that missions is not a side line of religion, but it is the spirit around which centers the entire work of Christianity. We urge that our young people be taught the spirit of Christ, who loved all people, regardless of race or condition.

We know that the women of the Christian Church have had a great part in the mission work of our Church. Therefore, we recommend:

1. That a Woman's Board of Missions for the Western North Carolina Conference be appointed.

2. That each woman present take it upon herself to increase the mission interests and endeavor in her local Church, and organize where societies are needed.

3. That a mission study class be formed in every Woman's and Young People's Society and in the Sunday Schools where there are no societies, using the study books prepared for that purpose.

4. That more of our people subscribe to *The Christian Missionary*.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your Sunday School Committee begs to submit the following report:

The reports of the Sunday School Convention show that the Sunday Schools of the Church are on the increase, and we feel that no Church is fully equipped unless it maintains a Sunday School for its children. This growth, we feel, is due to the interest and devotion of the Board of Religious Education and the untiring efforts of the field secretary of the board, Miss Lucy M. Eldredge.

This Board of Religious Education is worthy of the united and devoted support of this Conference. We feel that no department of our work has so great a future as this, and no effort should be spared to support it. We therefore recommend:

1. That the workers in our Churches frequently call upon our field secretary for service and information. This will aid the secretary in her work of promoting the cause of religious education in the local Churches of the Conference.

2. That each school strive to maintain the front-line standard, and that a monthly offering be taken for our Mission Board and a monthly offering for our Orphanage.

3. That the work of week-day religious instruction and the daily vacation Bible school be endorsed by this Conference, and the value of this work be impressed upon our Churches.

4. That the Chautauqua and School of Methods, held each summer at Elon College, be heartily endorsed by this Conference, and that each local Church be urged to have a representation at this Chautauqua and School of Methods, and that each pastor be urged to call the attention of his people to this work and lead them, in every way possible, to a loyal support of it.

5. That each of the local Sunday Schools strive to give the financial aid requested and send a representation to the North Carolina Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Convention, held each year during the second week in July, and that the Sunday Schools co-operate in the Men and Millions Movement.

6. That the Committee on Sunday School and Christian Endeavor be merged into one committee. We believe that such a merger would facilitate the work of these committees.

Report on foreign missions read by Secretary, discussed and adopted.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The growth of the Church is measured by, and limited to, the power and development of the missionary spirit and vision. "Where there is no vision, the people perish" applies with unvarying emphasis to the missionary vision. Since Jesus gave the command, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature," till this good day, God in His wisdom has never prospered a Church or a people who has not sought with all its strength and power to

obey that command. We find and develop our Church life at home by losing it in Christ's name for those abroad and out yonder who have never had nor heard the gospel. The principles and government of the Christian Church are not responsible for the tragic and deplorable fact today that, after one hundred and twenty-five years of denominational existence, we have only one hundred thousand members. If we had had the missionary vision all these years and had done our best to obey the great commission of our Lord, we would today number our adherents by five hundred thousand or a million, rather than by a small fraction of that number. We might as well face the stubborn fact, and deal with it; that we cannot grow, God will not let us grow, until we become missionary in fact and in spirit.

We are now doing foreign mission work in Porto Rico and Japan. In Porto Rico a population of seventy thousand has been assigned to us Christians to try to reach with the gospel. In Japan, a population of four hundred thousand has been assigned us. Unless we carry or send the gospel to these, it will not be carried to them at all, as the other denominations have their full quota without these. They will wait in heathen darkness or die without the gospel unless we carry it to them. And the call and the need in China, in India and in Africa are as loud and as great as in Japan or Porto Rico.

We recommend:

First.—That in all our homes and in all our Churches we pray earnestly for God to give us missionaries to go out for us.

Second.—That we urge our people to give as much to preach the gospel in foreign mission fields as we give to preach the gospel at home.

Third.—That we urge our pastors and delegates to organize a Woman's Missionary Society and a Young People's Missionary Society in every Church.

Fourth.—That we, in all our Sunday Schools, have some one to speak on missions before the whole school at least once a month, and that on that Sunday an offering be taken for missions.

Fifth.—That all our Churches, at a service nearest Christmas, take a Christmas offering for missions, one-half for home, one-half for foreign missions.

Sixth.—That we appreciate what the Woman's Board has done in putting Miss Pattie Coghill in the field as a helper in organizing missionary societies in all our Churches, and that we seek this year to get Miss Coghill to each of our Churches to organize a Missionary Society.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

There is today a veritable flood of literature, dealing with every conceivable phase of religious life and work. Much of it is really helpful; some of it is interest; and not a small part of it is absolutely dangerous. If you are going to read extensively in the field of religious literature, unless you are thoroughly grounded in the Word of God, read nothing that is not recommended by some one whose judgment and discrimination you can trust.

Our denominational publications—*The Christian Sun*, *The Herald of Gospel Liberty*, *The Christian Missionary*—and the various publications on Christian education are excellent. They compare most favorably with those published by the stronger denominations, and deserve a wider circulation and a more careful reading.

The one indispensable book for the Christian, and the one the average Christian knows least about, is the Bible—"The sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God." We would not be too critical, but it seems to us that each succeeding generation knows less about the Word of God as the sword of the Spirit. The old chimney-corner saint of the past generation, whose reading was halting and tedious, but whose heart was enlightened by the Spirit, had a better working knowledge of the Bible than many of our modern high school and college graduates. Our uniform Sunday School Lessons, though they have much to commend their use, are failing to give the knowledge of the power and use of the Word of God. Our only recommendation is that we go back to the prayerful study of God's Book to find the way of righteousness and salvation.

This board recommends further that this Conference encourage its constituency to support as liberally as possible, in word and deed, the Mission Board of the Southern Christian Convention, and that this Conference hereby go on record as favoring the administration of all of its Home Mission funds and Foreign Mission funds through the Mission Board of the Southern Christian Convention, after the above-named financial obligations shall have been fully discharged.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

On September 1, 1923, Japan was visited by one of the most disastrous earthquakes in the history of modern times, destroying multitudes of people and many millions worth of property and business. In this great disaster, in which more than a quarter of a million of lives were reported lost, not one of our missionaries lost his or her life. For this we are profoundly grateful! A number of our buildings were badly damaged. Because of this disaster, we are compelled to urge our people to make the most liberal offerings for our Japan work, that we may quickly re-establish it and so give it a chance to go on winning souls for Christ. At this coming Christmas time, we hope many liberal donations may be made for that work.

We are in need of more missionaries. Let us adopt the Master's way of recruiting—pray the Lord of the harvest to send more laborers. While we can expect only a few to go to the foreign field to labor, many must give of their means to support the work. Every true Christian should be much in prayer for the blessings of God upon both the home and foreign fields in the work we are seeking to do in His name.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

1. Your committee received from the Alabama Christian Conference official notice that said Conference had unanimously voted that Licentiate J. H. Dollar be ordained an elder, and since Bro. Dollar could not be present at his Conference this year, the Alabama Conference requests the North Carolina and Virginia Conference to ordain him, and we recommend that this request be granted.

2. Archie Hine Hook, of the Elon Christian Church, licensed at Hines Chapel by this Conference one year ago, is now a member of the senior class at Elon College, and has served three Churches as pastor the past year, all of which Churches request his ordination. After due examination by your committee, we deem him qualified, and recommend his ordination.

3. William Tate Scott, member First Christian Church, Greensboro, N. C., licensed at Danville, Va., two years ago, has served four Churches the past year, all of whom request his ordination. After due examination by your committee, he is deemed qualified, and we recommend his ordination. He is

a member of the senior class in Elon College and requests a loan of \$150 to enable him to graduate; and we recommend that same be granted.

4. Sion Milton Lynam, of the Elon College Christian Church, was licensed at Park's Cross Roads Church three years ago and has served Churches since that date. Antioch Christian Church, of which he has been pastor the past three years, recommends that he be ordained. After due examination by your committee, we deem him qualified, and recommend his ordination. He is a member of the senior class of Elon College, and requests a loan of \$150 to enable him to graduate. We recommend same be granted.

5. Rev. G. C. Crutchfield, previously ordained an elder, is a member of the senior class in Elon College, has served successfully in the pastorate the past year, and requests a loan of \$200 to enable him to graduate. We recommend that same be granted.

6. Licentiate H. E. Crutchfield reported that he has served as pastor of one Church the past year, is pursuing his studies in Elon College as a member of the sophomore class, and, we are advised, is making commendable progress. He is open for other work the coming year, and we recommend him to the favorable consideration of any Church needing his services.

7. Your committee received the attached communication from the Presbyterian Synod of North Carolina, in session in Graham, October 9-11, 1923, relative to the teaching of the Bible in State colleges. We submit the communication as presented to us, and recommend its favorable consideration by this body.

8. Licentiate R. H. Coble made his annual report to your committee, showing that he remains loyal and faithful to his Church and Conference as a licentiate, and while, because of health and local conditions, he has not been able to do much preaching, he has been deeply interested in his local Church and Sunday School, and has rendered faithful service there. We commend him for his zeal, and recommend that his license be continued.

9. Licentiate I. T. Underwood reported that he had served as pastor of one Church the past year. He is recommended to be continued as a licentiate.

10. Rev. W. W. Skellette, Reidsville, N. C., of the Free Will Baptist Church, makes application to become a member as an ordained elder of this body. He comes with proper letters of recommendation and transfer from the Free Will Baptist Church, where he is in good standing and in which he has had several years' experience as pastor. We recommend that he be received as an elder in this Conference.

REV. JEREMIAH WOOD HOLT.

BORN DECEMBER 7, 1848—DIED AUGUST 3, 1923.

Your Committee on Memoirs knows of no more fitting tribute to be paid to the memory of our fallen comrade and brother in Christ than that of Dr. W. W. Staley, spoken on the day of the funeral, in the Burlington Christian Church, and printed in *The Christian Sun* August 30, 1923.

The passing of Rev. Jeremiah Wood Holt, of Burlington, N. C., removes from active service in the Christian Church a conspicuous figure in the North Carolina Christian Conference. For nearly fifty years he had taught school, preached, and filled official positions in his Church and Alamance County. He came of sturdy parentage, and lost none of the qualities of his ancestors. He had convictions, with courage that was sometimes considered stubborn. His lifework was, therefore, rigid in teaching and in his own practice. He was free from deceit, flattery, or palliation. His motives were better than his speech. He prided himself in not being afraid to say what he thought. He was stern in his nature, dogmatic in his preaching, and loyal to his Church. Success did not elate him, defeat did not discourage him, and continuous work was the soul of his ministry.

As a man, he was genuine; as a student, he was painstaking; as a pastor, he was devoted to his flock. Exemplary in business, faithful in his domestic relations, and true in his friendships. He was twice married, and died without children. His first wife was Miss Bettie Whitsett, a woman of rare religious and domestic qualities, who passed away in the triumphs of an unshaken faith in Jesus Christ. His second wife was Miss Mollie E. Tarpley, who survives her husband, after filling her place as his companion in sickness as in health. She has the sympathy and prayers of a large circle of friends, and has the faith to trust Him whom her husband served.

Thirty years ago he was considered a radical on the subject of temperance. He advocated that course when it was unpopular, and lived to see prohibition incorporated in the Constitution of the United States and ratified by a majority of the States. The radical of thirty years ago is the conservative of today. His reputation in this field of service spread over his native State, and that work, no doubt, was the crowning feature of his ministerial career. The reason for his life advocacy of the temperance cause lay deep in his soul, and found utterance in his speech and in his vote. It was the most outstanding characteristic thing in his ministry; and he meant it to be so. The result of temperance in the prohibition of the liquor traffic in this nation shows us that Bro. Holt was a forelooking and far-looking minister; or, in modern phrase, a man of vision. He has passed to his reward, but his works do follow him.

A very large congregation filled the Burlington Christian Church on Saturday afternoon, August 4th, including many preachers from the Elon College Chautauqua, and the service was simple, sincere and sacred. Pastor G. O. Lankford, P. T. Klapp, and W. W. Staley, student associates in the old Graham School, and P. H. Fleming, associate in county board work, were on the platform and took part in the service. A trio of ladies rendered hymns; men who had been students acted as pallbearers, and ladies who had been his students carried the abundance of flowers.

On motion, the report of the Budget Committee was adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF BUDGET COMMITTEE.

We recommend that this committee be known in the future as the Budget Committee instead of as the Apportionment Committee. Our thought is that the apportionments are in no sense an assessment, but suggestions to the Churches as to what is needed as a minimum to carry on the work of the Conference and its enterprises.

We recommend that each Church be asked at once to adopt this suggested amount as part of its local budget, and that the Secretary of the Conference so notify the secretary of each Church in writing.

We recommend that each Church take steps at once to raise its local budget, including the Conference budget, by an every-member canvass, using the envelope system of payment, weekly or monthly, or semi-monthly, as the Church has preaching service, and that the Conference budget be remitted to the Treasurer of Conference quarterly—on February 1, May 1, August 1, and November 1—he to give the Conference a report of what has been thus paid in at the annual meeting. We recommend that the Mission Secretary of the Southern Christian Convention be asked to aid our Churches in making this plan effective.

We regret to report that some two or three Churches have asked for a reduction in their part of the Conference budget, alleging in every case that it is too much. These Churches are honestly mistaken. The trouble is not that the Churches are asked to raise too much money, but with our lack of system and of biblical methods of raising it. We say it deliberately—our Churches can pay to the Conference budget ten times what we are now paying, if we will use the every-member canvass and tithe our incomes.

We, therefore, recommend that the budget for the ensuing year be exactly the same as last year, with th hope that some Churches will voluntarily increase their gifts. We promise every such Church the opening of the windows of heaven for it and an outpouring of divine blessings such as it has not conceived to be possible.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN UNION.

At our last session, we joined with the Eastern Virginia Conference in a memorial requesting the Executive Committee of the Southern Christian Convention to appoint a committee on closer co-operation with the Free Will Baptists. The commission was appointed, and held a meeting with a like commission of the Free Will Baptists, in Raleigh, in February of this year. Certain agreements were therein entered into and printed in *The Christian Sun*. The chairman of this committee attended the Free Will Baptist Convention, meeting in Greenville, in September, and was accorded the privilege of the floor.

At our last session, we appointed two delegates—Drs. W. A. Harper and J. O. Atkinson—to represent us at the approaching session of the World Conference on Faith and Order, to be held at Washington, D. C., in May, 1925. We trust these delegates will attend this gathering.

We learn, with approval and appreciation, of the intention of the General Convention of our Church shortly to issue a pronouncement on "Christian Union," and to inaugurate an intensive campaign for the education of our people in the need and method of Christian union.

We recommend:

1. That we seize every opportunity possible to present the cause of Christian union, and the platform of our Church as the working basis of it.

2. That, particularly, our ministers be urged to preach on this great theme.

3. That the Program Committee of the Conference be asked to provide place in the next year's program for the consideration of Christian union, and that the constituent conferences of this body be urged to do likewise in their annual session programs.

We also recommend that the mission secretary of the Southern Christian Convention be asked to aid our Churches in these endeavors.

3. And it is agreed that the Christian Temple will pay from their mission fund, through the Mission Board of the Southern Christian Convention, \$200 to the First Christian Church, Portsmouth, and \$200 to Elm Avenue Christian Church, Portsmouth, on salaries of pastors of said Churches.

We regret that we have no funds in hand with which to help the Richmond Church, but assure them that their request has our sympathy and our prayers; and the same is true with regard to South Norfolk Church.

ORIGIN, HISTORY AND PRESENT STRENGTH OF CHRISTIAN MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION.

1. ORIGIN.

The idea was first suggested by Rev. J. P. Barrett, at the Southern Christian Convention, in Suffolk, Va., in May, 1890, under the name, "Missionary Convention." This idea developed into the "Christian Missionary Association" in the Southern Christian Convention at Elon College, N. C., in May, 1892; and

the Christian Missionary Association was organized with fourteen members and one hundred and forty dollars paid—ten dollars per member. E. E. Holland was elected president; W. T. Herndon, vice-president; P. A. Savage, secretary; and T. R. Gaskins, treasurer. A constitution was adopted, and Berea, Norfolk County, Va., was chosen as the place, and November 1-4, 1892, the time for the first regular annual meeting.

2. HISTORY.

At the first regular meeting, seventeen members were enrolled and \$155 collected. The annual meetings continued for seventeen years with different Churches within the Conferences of the Southern Christian Convention, as the association embraced the whole of the Southern Christian Convention. It was composed of individuals and delegates from Conferences, Sunday Schools, and other societies. The annual dues were \$10 for men and organizations, and \$5 for women. The real purpose of the association was to cultivate the spirit of missions and render special help in the financial work of the Church. In other words, to give individuals and organizations an opportunity to give and control the expenditure of such gifts.

On account of long distances and the expense of attendance when sessions were held at different points within the Convention, after seventeen years, the plan was changed from one C. M. A. within the Convention to one C. M. A. within each Conference; and this plan has been in operation for fifteen years, making the total history a period of thirty-two years.

The following table shows the financial result of the seventeen years under the Southern Christian Convention and the fifteen years of the C. M. A. of the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference:

The association has aided Winchester and other Churches in the Valley of Virginia, paid missionaries in that section through a period of years, aided Graham, Ramseur, and Raleigh, in North Carolina; Columbus, Ga., Newport News, Old Zion, Isle of Wight Courthouse, South Norfolk, Portsmouth, and Norfolk in Virginia, and created a good missionary atmosphere. The association has spent some \$35,000 through the seventeen years under the Convention, and the fifteen years in the Eastern Virginia Conference. The figures and scope of the work in the other Conferences is not in hand to give full detail of the entire work. The average has been more than a thousand dollars a year.

At the session of the Eastern Virginia Conference C. M. A., held in Portsmouth, Va., in 1919, J. E. West suggested, in a speech, that a plan should be

laid to give every member of the Churches within the Southern Convention an opportunity to make a special gift to missions; and this resulted finally in the organization of the Men and Millions Movement the next year (1920), to run five years and close in 1925. This to be the greatest financial movement in the history, and has put a new emphasis upon all the departments in the Church enterprises.

3. PRESENT STRENGTH OF THE EASTERN VIRGINIA CONFERENCE C. M. A.

A fixed constituency of about 200, an interest in missionary work, a thankful pride in the history and activity of the association, and a new loyalty to the Church created by thirty-two years of help in a financial way above the regular channels of giving. It has also discovered new capacity and willingness to give and serve, which is a sure sign of strength.

Presentation of bills for printing of 1,000 membership fee blanks, \$3.75. The bill was ordered paid.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE BOARD.

At the last special session of this Convention, the report of the Revision Committee was referred to the Executive Board, with power to act. After carefully considering this report, we recommend that the cloth-bound copies of the Principles and Government be sold for 40 cents per copy, and the leather-bound copies for 50 cents per copy. We recommend that the matter of issuing another edition of this book be deferred for the present.

In November, 1923, a request was made for contributions from the Churches and Sunday Schools for the support of the Board of Religious Education of the General Convention. Your Board approved this call, subject to the approval of the various Conferences of the Convention, until May 1, 1924, at which time a policy of support might be considered by Convention in regular session.

In December, 1923, the Board approved a call for voluntary offerings for the relief of the Japanese missionary work. On account of the great distress occasioned by the great earthquake, the need appeared urgent.

The Board accepted the invitation of the Christian Temple, Norfolk, Va., as a place for holding the 1924 session of this Convention.

Report of the Board of Superannuation was read by Dr. J. O. Atkinson, chairman. On motion, the report was recommitted to the Board, with a request that a recommendation be made for providing an increase in the contributions to this fund.

Report of the Orphanage Board was read by Mr. Chas. D. Johnston, superintendent, and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF CHRISTIAN ORPHANAGE.

The Lord was good to us during the year just passed, and we are very grateful. While we had a scourge of sickness during the months of February and March, 1924, and a number of our children had pneumonia and "flu," and

a number of them critically ill, God saw fit to stay the hand of death, and all have been spared, and we are grateful.

The Churches, Sunday Schools, and friends have been loyal, and the income would have been sufficient to maintain the 105 children we have in our care had it not been for the amount spent on our old building by painting the interior, put in much new floor, also put in new bedsteads, mattresses and furniture throughout, which cost quite a sum of money; but it was a necessary expense and had to be done.

It became necessary to build a swimming pool for the benefit of the children, which has not only added much sport for the children, but has contributed much to safeguard their health.

Mr. Lawrence S. Holt, who made a deed of trust several years ago and set aside quite a sum of money for charity and remembered the Christian Orphanage in this deed of trust, but reserved the right to revoke it at any time he saw fit, and did revoke it and cancel it last June; but on the same day he made another deed of trust in which he set aside a sum of money for charity, and in this deed of trust he gives the Christian Orphanage the sum of \$900 per year. This amount is payable in equal installments every two months. He also makes this deed of trust irrevocable and makes provisions that this amount shall go to the Christian Orphanage as long as it exists as an institution of charity. He also reserves the right in this to add to it any time he sees fit. We are indeed grateful to Mr. Holt for this gift.

DAIRY.

It has been the aim of the Orphanage management in charge to build up a first-class dairy to furnish the required amount of milk for the children, viz: one quart per day per child. We are happy to say that we now have a nice herd of milch cows, composed of Holstein and Jerseys, which are furnishing twenty-five gallons per day and much nice butter. We are hoping that in a few more years to have a dairy here that we will all be proud of and one that will be quite an asset to the institution.

FARM.

We are happy to say that our farm, which was at one time in the history of the institution a liability, has become quite an asset. We are trying to improve the farm from year to year, and at this time are sowing much of it in clover to improve the land and make hay for the cattle. The management is planting lots of fruit trees of different kinds, and hope in a few years to have fruit to supply the children, a thing they like and need.

PORK.

We have two little boys who look after the hogs and feed them. Last year these little fellows raised more than 4,000 pounds of meat and were very happy over the success. It is also quite an item for food supply.

SCHOOL.

Our school, consisting of the five first grades at the Orphanage, has been in charge of Mrs. B. S. Brown, and the other grades have attended the graded school in town. Plans are on foot now to build a larger school-house and have all the children attend the school in town. We are very highly complimented by the State Board of Charities and Welfare workers in having this fine arrangement, as it gives our children an opportunity to mingle with other children in the community and catch the community spirit. We are very happy to say that the religious atmosphere at the Orphanage has never been better. Forty of our children have made a profession this year and have joined the Church.

IN KIND.

The good women—the best of God's creation—have been exceedingly kind to us, and have made and sent to the Orphanage, to help us in this work, many sheets, pillow-cases, quilts and many beautiful little dresses made of nice material, with much love put in the making, and the hearts of the little girls have been filled with joy by the kindness shown them by our good women.

The Orphanage management is very grateful to Drs. Walker and Dick, of Gibsonville, N. C., for their splendid co-operation in our work. They are very faithful to attend our sick ones and will come day or night and give their services free of charge. Dr. W. E. Walker, of Burlington, N. C., has been real kind to us in dressing wounds, lancing boils and any other trouble we have called on him for. He also gives his services free. Dr. J. H. Brooks, of Burlington, looks after the children's teeth, and gives his services. We are grateful that we have these kind friends in the medical profession, and it is quite a help to us in our work.

Sam Davis asked the Convention for five minutes, which was granted, and he offered himself and wife to the Christian Convention for service. Mrs. Davis then sang "Amazing Grace" as a solo, while Mr. Davis presided at the piano. Motion passed that Mr. and Mrs. Davis be given a rising vote of thanks.

Mr. Jas. H. Lightbourne moved the matter of the services of Mr. and Mrs. Davis be referred to the Mission Board, and that they be asked to report back to this session. Motion passed.

Mrs. McD. Howsare was then introduced by Dr. W. W. Staley, who spoke on "Our Women and the Missionary Task."

Report of the Mission Board was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF MISSION BOARD.

As the Mission Board meets annually on or about September 15th, the fiscal year with our missionary program and appropriations begins September 1st. To make our report to the Convention clear and comprehensive, it is necessary to give appropriations made for the past year (September 1, 1922, to September 1, 1923), and those decided upon and being made for the present fiscal year ending September 1, 1924.

The above collections, of course, do not cover items coming through the regular channels of Conferences, Men and Millions, nor Convention, since these items go directly to the Treasurer of the Convention, and are transmitted to the Treasurer of the Mission Board by drafts from the President of this Convention.

SUNDAY SCHOOL MISSIONS.

One of the most significant and gratifying items of our missionary work is the constantly growing interest in missions in our Sunday Schools. Practically all of our most active schools have now adopted the plan worked out by this Convention and ratified by all of our Sunday School Conventions of giving one offering a month for missions—one-half for home and one-half for foreign missions. We urge that this plan be continued and emphasized until all our schools shall have a part continuously, not only in giving to missions, but in studying and learning about missions. In very many of our schools, there is a missionary program or address before the whole school, either every Sunday or once a month. Donations from Sunday Schools the past year amounted to \$3,015.03. One-half of this amount goes to the support of our mountain work, and the other half to foreign missions, as already stated. We have the faith to believe that we shall, in the future, have not only more funds for missionary purposes, but more recruits for the missionary field. Missionary teaching must be to the youth, if it is to be effectual, and there is no better place for this than in the Sunday School.

OUR MOUNTAIN WORK.

There are at present two organized Christian Churches in Carroll County, Va., and three or four additional preaching places where there are good pros-

pects for Churches. Rev. M. T. Sorrell is the pastor in charge. We have assisting him in the work Mrs. M. T. Sorrell and Miss Margaret H. Morey, giving all their time to the day and Sunday School work, and Miss Rigney, a native of the mountains, who has been assisting the past several months because of our inability to secure an outside teacher for the work at Rocky Ford. We have a combined Church and school building at Elk's Spur, which is serving a most useful purpose, both for the day school, for which there are separate rooms, and for Sunday worship, for which there is an adequate auditorium.

We have recently built, at an expense of about \$1,200.00, a five-room bungalow for our preacher and teachers at Elk's Spur.

There is pressing demand for another building at once, for the two former congregations which have now consolidated into one. The land for this building has already been donated, and much lumber and timber and assistance promised in erecting the building as soon as we are ready. We recommend that this building be erected just as soon as funds are available. We are conducting a day school and Sunday School in the Rigney home, near the site of this proposed building, and also using the home as our regular preaching place twice per month. The work in Carroll County, Va., is certainly a most worthy one, and opportunity for real service is great indeed. The people are appreciative, and a genuine community spirit is being developed by our Christian forces at work there.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Since our last report to this body, we have paid to the foreign work in Japan \$3,311.29; to Porto Rico, \$1,053.33; to the general fund (Japan and Porto Rico and Japan, and the work goes well. Bro. and Sister Barrett are a total for the year of \$9,605.41. We are very glad to report that five missionaries were sent out the past year, three to Japan and two to Porto Rico. There are other volunteers for the mission field, most of whom are now at colleges, preparing, and will soon be ready to go out for us. Rev. and Mrs. D. P. Barrett, who were the sole representatives on the foreign field for this body, have been faithful in the discharge of their duties, as have our other missionaries in Porto Rico and Japan, and the work goes well. Bro. and Sister Barrett are much broken in health and are soon to come home on furlough for a much-needed rest.

Our Burlington Christian Sunday School is to be most heartily congratulated on the zeal they display in behalf of foreign missions by the support of Miss Stacy in Japan, at a salary of \$1,000.00 a year; and the Christian Temple, Norfolk, Va., on its support of Mrs. Toshio, in Japan, at \$15.00 per month; Miss Olive Williams, in Porto Rico, at a salary of \$720 per year, and two other missionaries on the home field. We cannot commend too highly the example of these two Churches, and sincerely trust that others of our Sunday Schools and Churches will follow this lead.

MEN AND MILLIONS.

The Board has looked after collecting Men and Millions the past year to the best of its ability and understanding. Our Secretary and his helpers have held group meetings and personal conferences with practically every pastor and captain in every Church. While our collections have not been as liberal as we had hoped, they have been gratifying, and we believe that the morale of the movement is increasing, rather than decreasing, with age. For the most part, the people who can pay are making an effort to do so, and in many instances real sacrifices are being made to meet Men and Millions obligations. Wherever pastors and captains have co-operated, collections have been good, and the spirit of the movement is fine. Where these do not co-operate, there is great difficulty, as a rule, in collecting. We have ninety-eight of the books, and are collecting from the central office. We have, so far, been unable to secure some over sixty, in cases where they are desired. There were forty Churches that did not make subscriptions. These funds, as collected, are turned over to Executive Secretary C. D. Johnston at the end of each month, and accounts

are kept by him with the Churches. Through him, the money has been transmitted to the Treasurer, C. D. West, who handles same according to vouchers drawn and presented by Executive Secretary C. D. Johnston. Independently of these reports, we have endeavored to recreate interest in the movement and in every enterprise of the Church through sermons, addresses and the printed page and personal letters.

We recommend that the time for collecting the pledges be extended, in keeping with the recommendations of the Finance Committee. We have the faith to believe that those who pledged, for the most part, not only did so in good faith at the time, but will live up to that faith as their own financial conditions will allow. We have most encouraging promises and prospects for collecting a larger part of the funds, provided the time limit is extended.

COMMENT.

This Board is under pledge to assist at Raleigh, N. C., in a substantial way as soon as our present outstanding obligations will allow. We are happy to report that a substantial and adequate Church structure is being erected there now, on the site of the former building. We have nowhere a more faithful and loyal band of Christian workers than in our Raleigh Church, and the Board desires to see, as our cause there so richly deserves, a Church-house worthy of our cause in the capital city of North Carolina.

South Norfolk, Va., has not had for years a house of worship adequate to their demands and needs, and the Board is glad to report not only a favorable outlook for a new building, but work already begun in collecting funds by the local congregation. We are under necessity of assisting in this larger building project as soon as other outstanding obligations will allow.

We have assisted Christian Temple, Norfolk, to the extent of \$40,000.00, all of which has been paid, though, in order to meet demands upon us, we were under constraint of borrowing \$12,000.00, of which \$1,000.00 has been repaid, and our obligations on this account now amount to \$11,000.00 in the form of a promissory note. The congregation of Christian Temple more than met the challenge of the Board, the Board originally agreeing to pay a maximum of \$40,000.00 on condition that Christian Temple raise \$110,000.00, thus assuring a building costing \$150,000.00. The cost of the present building, we are assured, is twice that amount, and more. We congratulate the congregation and this body on the happy and auspicious outcome of this undertaking.

Our Church in Richmond was opened for services last summer, and is now occupied by an enthusiastic and growing congregation. This Board paid half in the purchase price of the lot, and had paid the pastor's salary from the beginning. The Woman's Board of the Convention has Richmond as their home mission special and are undertaking to pay \$5,000.00 a year for a period of five years. The Richmond Church is an honor to our cause in the Virginia capital, and gives promise of steady growth and development.

We assisted our People's Church, at Dover, as an emergency matter, to the extent of \$5,000.00, the Church there having raised for their enlarged building program \$100,000.00. By this act, the Board undertook to show our Dover people our deep interest in their great task and our appreciation of their generosity in kingdom service.

Our North Alabama work, to which we are contributing this year only \$300.00, is most promising indeed and gives evidence of growing into a Conference of Churches within a few years.

Other places named in this report as receiving aid have all had our careful and prayerful consideration, and we have done the best we knew in the distribution of funds at our disposal.

Throughout the bounds of the Convention there are evidences of an awakening in matters of Church building and needs for houses of worship in centers where we do not now have them. We can only enter these centers and render aid as funds are available.

We feel that many Churches and peoples who did not contribute to Men and Millions will help in carrying forward the work the next few years, and the Board has voted that these Churches and people be given an opportunity to assist in our missionary effort and the great and ever-growing task before us.

INCREASE IN MEMBERSHIP.

According to THE ANNUAL of this year, the total membership of Churches composing the Conferences of this Convention increased in numbers from 28,418 to a total of 28,635—an increase of 217 members the past year. To this should be added the membership of the congregations in Carroll County, Va., which last year was 34, and this year 95. The sum total increase is 278 members.

The report was adopted, as follows:

The Special Finance Committee, in conference with several invited brethren, considered plans of finance, including the plans as recommended by Dr. W. W. Staley and Dr. W. A. Harper, and unanimously adopted the following recommendations:

(1) That time limit for final payment of Men and Millions pledges be extended to December 31, 1926.

(2) That total Convention apportionments be increased the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) annually, this increase becoming effective with the Conference year 1926-27; that, through official representatives of this Convention, this increased apportionment be placed before each Conference for approval at its 1924 session, and that the result of action by the Conference be reported to the next session of this Convention.

(3) That the Orphanage be omitted from the apportionment table.

(4) That no appeals be made for funds by the General Convention or any departments thereof, but that all such appeals be made directly to the Southern Convention.

(5) That the Southern Convention continue paying its foreign mission funds to the General Convention, as heretofore agreed upon; that an annual contribution be made to the General Convention from our Convention fund, not to exceed 20 per cent of the receipts from the Conferences to this fund, and that the various boards of our Convention co-operate with the General Convention on same basis.

(5-a) That the provisions of items 4 and 5 become operative from and after this session of the Southern Christian Convention.

(6) That, with the approval of the Mission Board, the mission secretary of the Southern Christian Convention be made stewardship secretary to aid our Conferences and local Churches in the most approved methods of Church finance.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON RELATIONS.

The report of the Special Committee on Closer Co-operation with the General Convention was submitted, and, on motion, adopted as follows:

1. By joint action at the Marion Convention, 1890, the Southern Christian Convention is a constituent member of the General Convention, entitled to membership on the basis of numbers.

2. As a supporter of the official objectives of the General Convention, in a financial way, the Southern Christian Convention agrees to co-operate upon the basis of official action by the General Convention; but only through the Southern Christian Convention.

3. The Southern Christian Convention does not consent to any appeals of any nature by the General Convention to Conferences, boards, local Churches,

or members, except through the Southern Christian Convention itself, and only for authorized General Convention purposes.

4. The Southern Christian Convention shall share in an equitable way, on a per capita basis, General Convention obligations to the Federal Council, and such other interdenominational organizations as the General Convention, in regular session, may assume.

5. All emergency actions of the General Convention shall be subject to ratification by the Southern Christian Convention before they are binding upon the Southern Christian Convention.

Report of Historian W. E. McClenney was submitted and adopted, with thanks, as follows:

REPORT OF HISTORIAN.

Mr. President, Members of the Convention, Friends and Visitors:

Agreeable to your appointment at the last session of this body, in Henderson, N. C., your humble servant has been attempting to do some original research work in the history of the Christian Church in the South during the past year. Some few things have been found that were deemed worthy of publication in *The Christian Sun*, and have been put in print. The appointment carried with it a request that a report be made to this body in writing at this session.

My daily duties have prevented my making any very extensive research during this time, as that kind of work is slow and extremely tedious. Sketches of one or two of the old Churches in the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference have been prepared and published. A deed of gift from Tignal Jones, of Mecklenburg County, Va., to Rev. James O'Kelly and wife, was located and a certified copy of same procured. This showed that Mr. Jones gave Mr. O'Kelly and wife a life interest in forty acres of land upon which he had evidently been living for some years prior to the date of the said deed (1789). An outline history of the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference from its organization to date was prepared, giving the most important items happening at each Conference. This has not yet been published. Printed copies of the Minutes of the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference were found for the years 1857 and 1859, and copies of same made. These complete the records of that Conference with the exception of 1855, 1856 and 1858, to the War Between the States. In these new-discovered minutes much new data was found.

In the year's research we have found that very little attention has been paid to the history of our Church in the past. Several times we have found in the old records that a committee would be appointed to gather up the history of the denomination in the South and put it in permanent form, but so far as we have been able to find, these committees never made any report, and the work was never accomplished; and what is worse, a great deal of the early data has been lost forever. There is still one source from which a great deal of data may be had, and that is the North Carolina State Library, as there are complete files of *The Christian Sun* in this library from the year 1838 to the pres-

ent, and perhaps annuals and other data much earlier, as North Carolina has done good work in preserving her history.

From observation, we, as a Church, have paid far less attention to this phase of our Church work than almost any of our neighbor Churches; much less than our brethren in this State. The Episcopalians have had their Meade, Bryan, and Goodwin; the Methodist Episcopal Church has had its Asbury, Lee, Bennett and McTyeire; the Methodist Protestant Church has had its Drinkhouse; the Baptists have had their Burkett, Read, Semple, Beale, Hobday and Jones; the Presbyterians have had their Foote, Howison, Waddels and Makemie; the Friends have had their Fox and others, and have scrupulously preserved their records in their book-room in Baltimore, Md., and in that vault will be found some of the oldest records extant in many of the Virginia counties.

As we have gone into research work along other lines and have consulted these historians, we have many times wished that our Church leaders had done as Caesar did in his great wars—appointed some one to write an account of what was done as it happened—so that we of today might know more about what the early fathers of the Christian Church did.

Our Church began its existence at a time when the amount given for religious purposes was indeed very small in Virginia, and perhaps less in other places. In 1783, Thomas Jefferson, the best-posted man on Virginia of his day, estimated that the total amount paid for the support of all the Churches in Virginia was only \$25,000.00; and from his notes on Virginia it may be inferred that he thought that this might be overestimated, even though it only amounted to 12½ each for the 200,000 tithables in the State at that time. Our Church membership was entirely rural at first; nor was education general among either the clergy or laity. It did not seem to dawn upon them that no nation, people nor Church has ever grown great until they had a history, with its great men to whom the youth might be pointed for inspiration; and for this reason this line, the historic, has been very much neglected, and while we have made great strides in education and other things, we are still without our Church historians. No one will rejoice more than your speaker when a thorough course has been prepared in the history of the Christian Church and has been put in the curricula of our Southern Colleges, to be required of all candidates for the ministry.

For a number of years we have been gathering what data we could find, and putting it together, so that it might be of some use to those who have the time to use it. A bound volume of manuscripts was placed in the library at Elon College, N. C., in 1912, but when the great fire of January, 1923, came it was consumed; yet when the original copies were made, duplicates were made, and we now have the contents of this volume with much new data ready to be bound, and this will some day fall to the lot of some library where it can be used by our people. THIRD DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

THURSDAY, MAY 1, 1924.

Convention met at 2 o'clock. Devotions led by Rev. W. L. Wells. Scripture lesson 15th chapter of John.

Report of Committee on Temperance was submitted and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Whereas, we, as a nation, are now passing through a period of very significant reconstruction, which condition is recognized as a result of the recent World War; and

Whereas, since the close of the war there has been increased activity on the part of a certain lawless element to magnify crime through publicity; and

Whereas, these opponents of law and order are taking advantage of present conditions in their attempt to prove the failure of the eighteenth amendment; and

Whereas, actual statistics show that crime, per se, is decreasing; and

Whereas, we believe that the burden of responsibility finally comes back to the individual citizen; and

Whereas, we believe that the disposition of the less conscientious citizen to disregard the sanctity of his ballot, and himself violate the law for personal profit, is due to the example set by men of influence and wealth who are filling official position in public life; therefore, be it resolved:

First, That we, the Southern Christian Convention, in biennial session assembled at Norfolk, Va., place ourselves on record, as we have in the past, as favoring unqualifiedly every effort being made to stem this tide of lawlessness.

Second, That we favor and most heartily approve the action now being taken by the good women of our land to more firmly establish a higher standard of law enforcement. Particularly do we pledge our support to the Woman's Law Enforcement League of America, which body has recently met in a most significant convention in our national capital.

Third, That we pledge our support to those members of our national Congress who are standing true to the eighteenth amendment.

Fourth, That we condemn unreservedly the practice of certain other members of Congress and men in public office elsewhere who are openly and flagrantly violating their oath of office, by patronizing the bootlegger, and who are using their official position to promote and practice graft, and who are themselves otherwise violating the law.

Fifth, That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to our chief executive, President Coolidge; to the members of Congress who represent the constituency composing this Convention, and to the Woman's Law Enforcement League of America.

Rport of the Board of Education was read by Rev. John G. Truitt and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

GENERAL CONSIDERATIONS.

The heartening note of progress and hope in our day is the growing insistence that we need more religious instruction. Investigations into the spiritual condition of the flower of our young manhood during the World War initiated this demand. More recent tests applied to public and high school pupils with reference to their ethical reactions have given further proof that impending paganism threatens our nation unless the religious instruction of our youth is more amply provided for.

These facts are not occasions of pessimism, but challenges to construct a program of religious education (we prefer to call it Christian education), reaching all the way from our homes, through our Churches and communities, to our colleges and universities. Diagnosis must precede prescription. The dis-

case must be definitely located before the surgeon can operate. Threatening "spiritual illiteracy" is our sickness today. The remedy is Christian education. We must consistently and intelligently provide it.

And we are providing it. The daily vacation Bible school, week-day schools for religious instruction, provision for teaching religion in State universities, the strengthening of the Christian colleges, are integrating steps in a statesman-like effort to solve the most pressing religious problem of our time. Part of this program, so far as our Convention is concerned, is under the jurisdiction of the Board of Religious Education. The college and university aspects of the program inhere in this board.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION IN STATE UNIVERSITIES.

The separation of Church and State in matters of education, largely the work of our own Horace Mann, was wise and inevitable in a land guaranteeing liberty of conscience in religious belief and practice, but this separation imposed on the Christian community a burden to educate the people in religion which we have not fully appreciated nor adequately provided for. We have sensed our duty and acknowledged our responsibility, and this presages victorious advance for the future.

The principle of the separation of Church and State means that religion cannot be taught at public expense in tax-supported institutions. At first this legal hindrance took the practical form of criticism of such institutions as Godless. They have, however, continued to grow and increase in favor and patronage, and in view of this fact a more considerate Christian attitude has seen in these great centers of student population the finest mission field in America. Today we recognize that the Churches are under obligation to provide religious instruction for the thousands of the children of Christian homes who annually flock to these institutions. The methods of approaching this matter are many, but all of them hopeful.

In North Carolina, our Church is co-operating with other Churches to bring about arrangements for religious instruction which the university will credit toward graduation. The plan of co-operation and control has not been fully matured, but the prospect is promising. We pledge our full sympathy to all such movements and rejoice that our day is given to see such forward steps entered upon for Christian ministry to State university students.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION IN DENOMINATIONAL COLLEGES.

But while realizing the strategic value of religious instruction for the students of State university and other tax-supported institutions, we do not in the least diminish our insistence that the denominational colleges need strengthening. The very growth of the State system of higher education makes it obligatory on the various Churches to give added physical equipment and a more adequate endowment to the denominational schools. It is a case of keep up or quit. The Christian Church is in no mood to quit.

Speaking of the denominational colleges, the Committee on the War and the Religious Outlook has this splendid testimony: "Such institutions as have been described do not overemphasize moralizing or preaching. They see to it that among the winds that blow about and upon the college campus is the wind of religion. The student hears the voice of it. He may not know whence it cometh or whither it goeth. He may hear it on the athletic field, or in the biological laboratory, or in the philosophical library. It surprises him not more to hear it in these places than from the desk of the preacher or the Bible teacher. Everywhere during his college course he finds a new unfolding of his universe, of nature and of human nature around him, and the laws by which they operate; and he finds the leaven of religion within the processes that yield him his enlarging knowledge. Danger is minimized that he will form the habit of making obsolete approaches to truth. He will not be aware of the alleged chasm between evolution and revelation. He will have heard of it as a bit of history, but he will have his faith grounded in a unitary, not a

bisected world. He has brought his religious impulses to college; the college has provided a rich environment which has allowed them healthful development. It cannot be said with mathematical precision how many colleges are able to command even inadequately all the influences and instrumentalities which we have been describing above. Almost every denomination has a few colleges of which this is an approximately true picture. The positive Christian quality of their graduates is a matter of common knowledge."

American life, American democracy, the American social order, need just "such institutions" as these at the center of the higher educational system, where "Christian character first and always" is the goal, the gripping objective. This Convention fosters two such institutions, and of them we now speak.

BETHLEHEM COLLEGE.

Bethlehem College, of junior grade with preparatory department, opened its doors September 12, 1923. The campus contains fifty acres, adjoining the prosperous town of Wadley, Ala. President Marshall W. Hook and his co-workers in the faculty and trustees have served our cause heroically during the initial year of this enterprise. During the year, fifty students have been enrolled, and next year the prospect looks good for one hundred.

The building so far has cost \$11,344.11, and \$2,020.89 are needed to finish it. The institution now owes on equipment \$2,500; on outstanding operating properly, it is estimated that \$2,500 will be needed. The operating expenses bills, \$2,300, and on money borrowed to build, \$6,000. To furnish the building next year are estimated at \$7,000. This means that Bethlehem needs from every source within a year a minimum of \$25,000 in round numbers. President Hook would add to this an administration building, the cost of which he does not suggest. The present building is a dormitory, part of which is being used for administration purposes.

ELON COLLEGE.

Elon College is enjoying the crisis of her heroic history. Born in poverty, nurtured in sacrifice, threatened with destruction by a disastrous fire, hedged about with standardizing tests she must meet or lose her prestige, Elon faces the future battered but undismayed. No college ever arose more triumphant from ashes than our Elon. And while the problems which confront her have sent many an institution tottering to her demise, Elon has all the vigor of youth and resiliency in her spirit.

The rebuilding program swings steadily forward toward completion. The cost of this program is estimated as follows: five buildings, \$425,000; furniture, \$75,000; campus fence and improvement of grounds, \$52,000—total, \$552,000. There has been paid in cash toward this program the following sums: P. J. Carlton, \$50,000; J. M. Darden, \$50,000; M. Orban, Jr., \$45,000; B. N. and J. B. Duke, \$50,000; Alamance County citizens, \$23,753.57; other interested friends and insurance, \$42,733.40—a total of \$261,486.97. There has been borrowed from banks against subscriptions \$148,750,000. There is needed now to complete the building program \$141,763.03, toward which Mr. W. F. Corwith has agreed to give \$25,000, Mr. M. Orban, Jr., \$20,000, and Mr. P. J. Carlton approximately \$35,000, leaving a net balance of \$61,763.03 yet to be provided.

Before the fire, Elon had an indebtedness incurred over a term of years for buildings and occasional annual deficits in the sum of \$114,750.00. When the rebuilding program is completed, Elon will be in debt perhaps \$300,000, all of which will be covered by subscriptions except the original indebtedness, and we hope even that.

Elon has resources as follows: value of plant after fire and before rebuilding began, as estimated by an expert appraiser of the Virginia Trust Company, \$389,810; value of rebuilding program to date (April 10), \$401,682.78, and when completed \$552,000; and endowment, \$417,195.95; total at present, \$1,208,688.73, and when completed, \$1,359,005.95. Her net worth when the building program is complete will, therefore, likely be \$1,059,005.95.

Elon must have at least a million dollars of endowment to be the college our hearts desire her to be. She must have \$500,000 endowment immediately to meet the North Carolina State requirements. We must also join the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools as soon as we can qualify financially.

The attendance at Elon during 1922-23 was 329; during 1923-24, it was 316. The graduating class for 1923 had 41 members, and that of 1924 had 40 members. Seven ministerial students are in the graduating class this year, six of them of our own Church. Three young women of the class are volunteers for the foreign field in our Church.

The plans for the future include an enlargement and strengthening of the faculty in keeping with the development of the physical plant. Our Christian Education Building is something unique in the college life of the country. We are expecting it to be a decisive factor in the bigger, better Elon toward which we confidently look.

DEATH OF TRUSTEES.

Elon has lost two splendid trustees and devoted friends in the death of Mr. J. D. Gray and Rev. W. G. Clements. The Convention should cause appropriate resolutions to be spread on its minutes respecting these faithful servants of the cause of Christian education.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

1. That College Day continue to be celebrated in each congregation on the Sunday or other day most suitable to each congregation.

2. That a special effort be made to increase the attendance on our colleges by our own young people.

3. That trustees be elected for "The Southern Christian Convention Trust Fund," and they be authorized to incorporate themselves to receive and administer funds for the S. C. C. and its institutions and enterprises.

4. That the Convention issue its bonds, executed on behalf of the Convention by the President, countersigned by the Secretary, under the seal of the corporation, to cover the indebtedness and financial requirements of Elon and Bethlehem Colleges, providing over a term of years for the retirement of the interest and principal of the same, thus placing the schools on a safe financial basis. This would require \$500,000—\$400,000 for Elon and \$100,000 for Bethlehem.

5. That the Convention express its official thanks for assistance rendered Elon to the following persons: P. J. Carlton, B. N. and J. B. Duke, J. M. Darden, W. F. Corwith, M. Orban, Jr., and W. E. Sharpe (for the citizens of Alamance County), and the other contributors to the emergency fund.

6. That the Southern Christian Convention, as voted in the Burlington session of the General Convention, enter into the denomination-wide educational campaign for \$1,425,000 for our colleges, the date for the beginning of the campaign to be January 1, 1925. (Action deferred till next session of the Convention, owing to extension of Men and Millions' period till December 31, 1926.)

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

REV. JOHN PRESSLEY BARRETT, D. D.

An Appreciation.

"There is a prince and a great man fallen this day in Israel." A prince of the Church was the Rev. John Pressley Barrett, D. D., who passed to his reward in the Lawrence Hospital, Winston-Salem, N. C., at 2 o'clock this afternoon. No man in the Christian Church had the confidence of the consecrated lay and ministerial workers of our brotherhood in more marked degree than our fallen brother. Those of simple faith, those to whom the Bible is the inspired Word of God, felt they had in him a champion of the highest order. And now he is no more. No more shall his impassioned eloquence stir our hearts through the spoken word. No more shall his versatile pen indite for an expectant host the words of inspiration and uplift. A great defender of the faith sleeps. Our hearts bleed for his taking, though we are glad to have given our day and generation the noble life of service our brother lived among us.

Dr. Barrett was born in Isle of Wight County, Va., in the neighborhood of Antioch Christian Church, in 1851. From his childhood his life was characterized by piety and consecration. There was never a doubt in his mind that God had called him to His ministry. He prepared himself for his lifework in the Suffolk Collegiate Institute and Richmond College, now the University of Richmond. He early developed a rare felicity of expression and rapidly won recognition as one of our leading writers. It is safe to say that during the past half-century no man in our Church has written more for our periodicals than Dr. Barrett. The people read his writings, and that gave him a tremendous influence. He served as editor of *The Christian Sun* (two terms) for many years, and of *The Herald of Gospel Liberty* for twelve years. He was at other times editor of other Church publications and a frequent contributor to general periodicals. He died in harness as editor of *The Christian Sun*. He had no dread of departing. For him, there was no moaning of the bar. His activity as a writer was not limited to his editorial work. He was the author of many powerful books. His first volume was entitled "Iola, or Facing the Truth." It

revealed a mind of rich imaginative power and a style characterized by a rare command of idiomatic English. The book exerted an enormous influence in the Southern Christian Convention. Other books from his pen were "The Centennial of Religious Journalism," "Forty Years on the Firing Line," "Fruit-Bearing Truths," "Modern Light-Bearers," and "Garden Spots in the Old Testament." It is not given to many men to be so fruitful in permanent service to the kingdom through their writings.

Dr. Barrett, as an editor, championed the various enterprises of the Church. He boosted Christian education, Orphanage work, and missions in particular. He stood for these causes when it meant to stand almost alone. And by his insistent pleading he won the hearts of the people to their support. As pastor of the Memorial Temple, he infused such a spirit of benevolence in the people that, first of any denomination in Virginia, that congregation gave as much money for missions as it paid its pastor. His pastorates at Raleigh, N. C., and Covington, Ohio, were signal in their kingdom achievements.

Dr. Barrett was a man of vision. He dared follow his vision to its logical consequences. He never counted the cost when the line of duty was clear to him. He was a man of many friendships. He loved his friends, but no influence could be brought to bear upon him to swerve one iota from what he conceived to be the path of his duty. Friendships of a lifetime were broken in many instances in the interest of truth as God gave it to him to see the truth. The truth of God was to him the inspiration of his every act and thought. It was the sublimest conception he could entertain.

If our brother had been called upon to select an epitaph for himself, there is no doubt he would have responded with the humility that ever characterized him—"Defender of the Faith." This he certainly was. The faith to him was a living reality. It had the power of salvation, the promise of the endless life into which his spirit has entered. His faith was nurtured by prayer. When he prayed, you felt that God heard, so intimately assuring were his words. He taught his people to believe and pray, whether as pastor or as editor. Spiritual results crowned his life's ministry. Blessed be the memory of our fallen brother. Peace to his ashes, and the consolation of the spirit to his bereaved wife, daughter, and other relatives. The greatness of his service, the certainty of his reward, will ever remain to them an inspiration and a benediction as they are to the Church of his choice, to whose promotion his splendid talents were devoted in self-forgetting abandon.

Therefore, be it resolved, That the Southern Christian Convention, in session at Norfolk, Va., has learned, with deep sorrow, of the death of its faithful and beloved editor, Dr. J. Pressley Barrett, and that this appreciation of his life, prepared at its request, be spread on its minutes, sent to Mrs. Barrett, and offered to the press for publication.

Resolved further, That the Convention adjourn in his honor at 1 o'clock on the afternoon of May 2d, and in a body attend his funeral at Suffolk, Va., leaving the Church at 2 o'clock, automobiles having been provided by the congregation of the Christian Temple.

Resolved, third, That the President of the Convention appoint six laymen as active, and six ministers, with himself as chairman, as honorary, pallbearers for the funeral, and that this committee be authorized to provide a suitable floral design for the occasion and to render the bill for the same to the Secretary of the Convention, who is hereby instructed to pay the same.

Resolved, fourth, That we bow in humble submission to the will of God, and pray upon his family and the Church the blessing of our Father, who doeth all things well.

Report of T. C. Amick, Custodian of Ministerial Loan Fund, was adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF T. C. AMICK, CUSTODIAN MINISTERIAL FUNDS OF THE SOUTHERN CHRISTIAN CONVENTION.

April 24, 1924.

DEAR BRETHREN:

Since your Custodian made his report to you at your last general meeting, the disastrous fire of January 18, 1923, which destroyed the Administration Building of Elon College, destroyed the books of your Custodian, and all notes held by him for this fund, as well as all his books and records of this fund. Every trace of the ministerial fund of the Southern Christian Convention seemed, just after this fire, to be wiped out.

But, starting with the bank deposits to the credit of this fund and the records of the certificates of deposit at the bank where this fund is kept, your Custodian has succeeded, and, to a large extent, he believes he has reconstructed this fund. Thanks are due to the brethren who have so generously assisted your Custodian in this work and responded so promptly when called on for information. Your Custodian is also greatly indebted to Rev. J. W. Wellons, D. D., who so kindly furnished his files of the ANNUALS of the Conferences of the Convention. Since his files were not complete, there may be several owing moneys to this fund whose names have not yet been found and who have not been written to by your Custodian.

As soon as your Custodian could take the matter up with the brethren, he wrote to those ministers where the ANNUALS showed that they had borrowed moneys from this fund and asked them to renew their notes. The larger number responded at once; but some of them have not answered to this day. Several who owe money to this fund have paid no attention to the request of your Custodian, and he is at a loss to know how a minister can do so. It is the Custodian's belief that several hundred dollars are still out with notes unsigned. Some of these notes represent moneys lent to ministers who have died in the work, and the money will never be repayed; others represent moneys lent to those who seem dead to their obligations to the sacred funds of the Church.

Report of Board of Religious Education was considered and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION TO THE SOUTHERN CHRISTIAN CONVENTION.

Norfolk, Va., May 1, 1924.

There is an enlarging vision and an increasing interest in religious education. Colleges and universities are putting it in their curricula; State grammar and high schools are giving time and credit for it in their courses of study. Churches are holding their daily vacation Bible schools, and in many instances maintaining week-day religious instruction.

The larger and more progressive Churches are employing their full-time superintendent of religious education. In addition to this, Sunday School officers and teachers and officials of Christian Endeavor Societies are reading books and studying methods to enable them to do more effective work and render a larger service.

The market is being flooded with books dealing with every phase of the child's life and full of suggestive methods for his advancement; and while some of the theories advanced will be found impracticable and will eventually be discarded, many of them are adaptable to all classes and sizes of schools, and will be found to be of inestimable value to all classes of workers. All this augurs well for the child and assures him more helpful instruction and adequate preparation for life.

Your Board, as far as force and means would permit, have endeavored to help our Sunday Schools to render more effective service through better organization and better-trained teachers. It is the desire of the Board to see each school do its best work for the Church and community, and we stand ready, through our field secretary, Miss Pattie Coghill, to render any assistance possible to help your school reach that goal.

ACTIVITIES.

Our field secretary has maintained a bureau of information, answering many inquiries, written notes for *The Christian Sun*, and on the Sunday School lesson and Christian Endeavor topics until the first of this year, since which time Rev. H. S. Hardcastle, Suffolk, Va., has very kindly written those notes for us. He has rendered splendid service, and your Board wishes, through this report, to express its deep appreciation to Bro. Hardcastle for this service. Our secretary has also aided in working up Children's Day and Convention programs, and in advertising the same, a number of individual Churches have been visited and assistance given for more complete organization.

Two Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Handbooks have been published, in which we have endeavored to present accurate statistics. The last number shows 182 Sunday Schools, with an enrollment of 20,787, and 52 Christian Endeavor Societies, with 1,786 members. The total amount raised by the Sunday Schools last year was \$28,124.54. These handbooks are distributed free to the Sunday Schools and Churches. One hundred and one Churches, Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies have been visited; 10 vacation Bible schools conducted, with an enrollment of 464, and 52 institutes with an attendance of 2,791 held during the biennium.

CHAUTAUQUAS.

Two years ago, the Chautauqua was put under the jurisdiction of this Board. The place of meeting was changed to Elon College, and the Chautauqua held the last of August, 1922. There were 43 adult registrations and about 50 children in the Junior Chautauqua. In 1923, the adult enrollment was 120, and the juniors 75, with an annual contribution of \$100 from the advertising fund of the college. Your Board has been able to meet the expenses of both Chautauquas without incurring a deficit. The college has donated room, light and water, and the use of the kitchen and dining-room. We have reduced expenses to a minimum. The program has been materially changed, giving less time to lectures and more hours to class-work.

CHANGE OF SECRETARIES.

In October, 1923, Miss Lucy Eldredge was elected headquarters' office secretary and field secretary of young people's work of the Board of Christian Education of the General Convention, and assumed her duties January 1, 1924. Miss Eldredge was the first field secretary of your board, and did a splendid constructive work. We were very reluctant to give her up as an active force in our field, but in her new position she is still aiding in our work here. The Board was fortunate to secure for half-time service Miss Pattie Coghill, who is dividing her time with the Woman's Mission Board. Miss Coghill is well equipped for the position, and the plan is working fine, and with the additional help we are getting from the General Board, our work will suffer but little, if any, from the curtailed service.

CO-OPERATION WITH GENERAL BOARD.

The Board of Christian Education of the General Convention is giving us splendid service in the South, through its Southern representative, Rev. James H. Lightbourne. Mr. Hermon Eldredge spent a month in setting up the religious educational program in the Christian Temple. Dr. W. P. Fletcher spent March in institute work in North Carolina, and is to be in the South again during September. Miss Eldredge is to spend two months here in connection with vacation Bible school and Chautauqua work. Mrs. Bullock is to be in both Chautauquas, and Mr. Eldredge is to make another trip to the Far South. This co-operation enables our Board to do more and better group work for our people.

FINANCIAL REPORT.

We have been able to meet expenses during the year and have used only \$500.00 of the \$1,000.00 appropriated to us at the special session of the Convention. Our present field plans call for less expense, and we hope to go forward without further financial embarrassment. Our Children's Day offerings have shown a marked increase. This should develop into a substantial source of income.

PLANS.

Our plans for this year include eight vacation Bible schools, in which we will be assisted by Miss Eldredge and Mrs. Bullock.

A series of institutes in September, assisted by Dr. Fletcher.

An earnest effort to make more practical and effective our Conference, Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Conventions to hold two Chautauquas—one at Elon College, and the other at Bethlehem College. We are planning to put unit work in our Chautauqua at Elon and give certificates from the International Council of Religious Education. This will be our first attempt at Bethlehem, but we hope to have a good interest from the start.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

1. That this session of the Convention provide for the financing of this Board, and that, until adequate provisions are made, the Board have access, as

heretofore, to the Children's Day offerings, the contributions from the Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Conventions, and its percentage from Men and Millions.

2. That each school be urged to send at least two representatives to the Chautauqua bearing all or part of their expenses.

3. That we express our gratitude to the Churches, Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies of the Southern Christian Convention for their hearty co-operation, which has made success attained possible.

4. That we elect Rev. Jas. H. Lightbourne as regional director of the Board of Christian Education for the South.

5. That we request each Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Society within the bounds of the Convention to make one offering per year, on the first Sunday in November, to the Board of Christian Education of the General Convention, and that the offering be made through this Board.

6. That we urge our Sunday Schools to acquaint themselves with the advantages and benefits of the daily vacation Bible school, and that, where possible, preparation be made for holding the same.

Report of Special Committee on Publications was submitted and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON PUBLICATIONS.

May 2, 1924.

We, the members of the Special Committee on Publications, respectfully submit the following report:

We desire, first of all, to express our sorrow over the passing of the editor of *The Sun*, Dr. J. Pressley Barrett. In view of the fact that a memorial proper will be presented by a duly appointed committee, we do not intend to present herewith a formal memorial, but we do hereby express our appreciation of the long and faithful service which Dr. Barrett has rendered to the Christian Church and the kingdom of God, both as a minister and as an editor. We mourn his passing, and extend to the members of his family our sympathy and our condolence.

We desire, in the second place, to express our appreciation of the mechanical excellence of *The Sun* as it has appeared under the direction of Prof. P. J. Kernodle. *The Sun* is convenient in size, attractive in appearance, and compares favorably with any periodical of like kind.

We recommend, first of all, that the Convention renew the contract with the Central Publishing Company, of Richmond, Va., under which *The Sun* has been published during the past two years, for the coming two years, July 1, 1924, to July 1, 1926. That contract, as proposed by the Central Publishing Company, reads as follows:

"The Central Publishing Company, Inc., of Richmond, Va., makes the following proposal:

"P. J. Kernodle will serve as managing editor for *The Christian Sun*, and the Central Publishing Company will print, mail and post an average weekly issue of four thousand (4,000) copies of *The Christian Sun* of 16 pages, size 11x14 inches trimmed, set in 10-point type, the advertising therein not to exceed an average of 6 pages per week, same to be printed upon 58-pound machine book white paper.

"Provided, and upon condition, that the said company shall have and receive, as and for full payment for its services and all expenses, the subscriptions to the said paper and all amounts received from advertisements appearing therein, and an additional bonus of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) per year, to be paid in monthly installments, which said three thousand dollars (\$3,000) shall be supplied by the Southern Christian Convention.

"(2) It is further understood and agreed that the only other expense to be borne by the said Convention is the cost of editing the said *Christian Sun*.

"(3) It is agreed that this contract shall be and remain in force for a period of two years from and after July 1, 1924, unless said contract shall be sooner terminated by the mutual consent of the Central Publishing Company and the Board of Publications of the Southern Christian Convention.

We recommend, secondly, the election of a Board of Editors, the members of which shall serve without salary, provided they shall be reimbursed for actual expenses for postage, stationery, and attendance at Board meetings. Such a Board to consist of six members—an editor-in-chief, a news editor, and four contributing editors—whose duties shall be as follows:

(1) The editor-in-chief shall be charged with the general editorial policy of *The Sun*, and shall have and exercise the final editorial authority.

(2) The editor-in-chief and managing editor shall be responsible for the manner of handling the departmental reports and all other reading matter.

(3) The news editor shall be expected to furnish personal, religious, and secular news items of interest.

(4) The contributing editors shall co-operate with the editor-in-chief in furnishing editorial and other matter.

3. The committee further recommends the following persons as an editorial board: Editor-in-chief, Dr. J. O. Atkinson; contributing editors, Dr. W. W. Staley, Dr. W. A. Harper, Rev. Stanley C. Harrell; news editor, Rev. Sion M. Lynam.

4. We recommend that the salary of Dr. Barrett be paid to his widow until the end of the present editorial year, ending July 1, 1924.

5. We recommend that this plan be put in operation as soon as suitable arrangements can be made with the acting editor and the Board herein provided for.

6. We recommend that any vacancy in the Editorial Board be filled by the Board of Publications, subject to the approval of the Executive Board of the Convention.

Resolved, That each Conference represented in this Convention be, and is, hereby requested to pass a resolution requesting and requiring each pastor to present to the membership of each Church he serves, at least four times a year, the Men and Millions Movement, explaining to them the great need of the enterprises which are supported, in part at least, by funds realized from this source, and urging all subscribers to Men and Millions to pay their subscriptions at the earliest possible date.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to furnish a copy of this resolution to the ministers of the Convention.

It was moved and carried that the minutes of this session be printed in pamphlet form for distribution among the ministers and Churches.

Report of the Board of Superannuation was resubmitted and, on motion, adopted as follows:

REPORT OF BOARD OF SUPERANNUATION.

The Board of Superannuation of the Southern Christian Convention met at Franklin, Va., December 5, 1923, with the following members present: Dr. J. O. Atkinson (chairman), K. B. Johnson, W. K. Holt, B. D. Jones.

The chair reported that Dr. Jay had resigned, having moved out of the bounds of the Convention, and by correspondence Bro. K. B. Johnson had been elected to fill the vacancy. Meeting was opened with prayer by Dr. C. H. Rowland, pastor of Franklin Church, who was asked to act as secretary. Minutes of former meeting then read and approved. Mrs. C. H. Rowland was elected secretary-treasurer. Applications read and the following was approved: Mrs. L. I. Cox, \$200; Rev. C. M. Dollar, \$150; Rev. J. W. Wellons, \$100; Dr. W. S. Long, \$200; Mrs. B. F. Young, \$150; Mrs. C. C. Peele, \$200; Rev. W. R. Knight, \$75; Rev. J. D. Wicker, \$300; Rev. W. G. Clements, \$200; Mrs. A. W. Lightbourne, \$150; Rev. P. L. Duke, \$300; Mrs. J. I. Jones, \$50—a total of \$2,075. One-half of this amount has been paid, and the remainder is due to be paid July 1st.

All the Conferences are co-operating in this fund, and all beneficiaries are being shown some appreciation and marks of our gratitude. We report with a real sense of our loss, the death of our beneficiaries since our meetings, namely: Mrs. A. W. Lightbourne, Rev. W. G. Clements, and Rev. W. R. Knight.

The Board is following the policy decided upon by this Convention to assist, as funds will allow, all ministers over 70 years of age, unless engaged in the active pastorate, or under that age when sickness or infirmity requires; and to assist all widows of ministers who were actively engaged in the ministry at the time of their death. This is a work of love and gratitude that should interest every man, woman and child in our Churches, and the small sums we now appropriate should be largely and rapidly increased. We are hopeful that this fund will grow from year to year, and that we shall soon be in a position to do for these faithful veterans of the Church and the cross, and their widows and dependents, as their loyalty, fidelity and unselfish labors deserve. We should at least raise the standard to \$300 a year for single ministers, \$400 a year

for married ministers, and \$250 a year for widows. This your Board hopes will be possible, by an increased income of funds, at an early date. This report having been referred to the Board for the purpose, recommend that Conferences increase their apportionments for superannuation from a basis of 5 cents per member, as at present, to 10 cents per member.

We, your Committee on Memoirs, beg leave to submit the following report:

We are called upon to make note of the departure of the following brethren since our last assembly:

Rev. J. W. Holt, Burlington, N. C., of the N. C. & Va. Conference, in the month of August, 1923.

Rev. H. H. Butler, Suffolk, Va., E. Va. Conference, in the month of February, 1924.

Rev. W. G. Clements, Morrisville, N. C., Eastern N. C. Conference, in the month of February, 1924.

Rev. J. Pressley Barrett, D. D., Elon College, N. C., Eastern Va. Conference and editor of *The Christian Sun*; died May 1, 1924.

Bro. J. D. Gray, Waverly, Va., Eastern Va. Conference, trustee of Elon College, in the month of June, 1923.

In the passing of these men, the Convention has suffered a great loss.

Bro. Holt was a prominent clergyman of the Church, of deepest convictions, a clear thinker, and unflinching not only in his stand for the right, but in his unceasing effort to bring the kingdom of God to man. He was uncompromising in his stand for the government and principles of the Christian Church, and was once called the "Watch Dog" of our principles. He was the pioneer leader of our home missions in the Church, and chairman of the committee

a long time. He was also an educator in North Carolina, and once ran for Governor of the State on the prohibition ticket.

Rev. H. H. Butler was a minister of the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference for about forty-five years, spending his entire life in that Conference and holding about fifteen different pastorates. He was a great orator and evangelist in his field, and a great preacher. No man was ever more loved nor dearer to the memory of those who knew him.

Bro. Clements, equally as prominent in the Church, came from the Civil War with only one arm. He became a minister in the Christian Church and was faithful in that ministry until the end. He was a member of the board of trustees of Elon College from the beginning of that institution to the end of his life. He was also Superintendent of Public Instruction of Wake County, N. C., for twelve years.

Of Rev. J. P. Barrett, D. D., who passed to his reward only yesterday, words do not express our feelings. He was a prince among us, and a warm friend and counselor to all of us. He was twenty-four years editor of *The Christian Sun*, twelve years editor of *The Herald of Gospel Liberty*, in which he distinguished himself as a minister of God, a preacher of the gospel and as a champion editor of all our enterprises. He was the pioneer champion of missions in the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference. None among us was ever more spiritual-minded, nor a stronger advocate of the fullness of the blessings of the gospel. He lived a holy life and communed constantly in the deeper works of grace. A good man is gone.

Of our Bro. Gray, a good and valuable layman of our Church is gone. He was a man of few words, but of sterling character and superior counsel in the affairs of the Church and its enterprises. We shall miss him in the years to come.

For these brethren we mourn. We shall long miss their fruitful service to the Church and all of its enterprises.

In conclusion, we recommend that a copy of these memoirs be sent to *The Christian Sun* for publication.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

While we rejoice to know that interest in world evangelization has been growing in our Conference during the last several years, we, your Committee on Foreign Missions, feel that, so far, we have been merely playing at the game of missions. We are glad to learn that, during the past Conference year, our Woman's Board of this Conference has raised approximately \$191.63 for foreign missions. We note also with pleasure that our Churches are showing increased interest in this important work. Lack of adequate reports makes it impossible, however, to give a definite statement of the amount contributed to foreign missions by the entire Conference. We rejoice at what has been accomplished during the past year in our Japan and Porto Rico fields. We call upon all our Churches to stand behind the foreign mission program of the Christian Church. In order that we may more fully co-operate in the work, we believe that a unified program of missionary effort should be conducted throughout the Conference. To that end, we recommend:

1. That a Conference Mission Committee, headed by a Conference Mission Secretary, be appointed to direct this work.
2. That each Church appoint a Secretary of Missions to direct the entire missionary instruction of the Church; and that this secretary be assisted by a Committee on Missions, composed of a representative from each department.
3. That the Mission Secretary and committee co-operate with the Board of Christian Education in making the study of missions a vital part of the Church life.
4. That each Church of this Conference plan for a definite period of six weeks each year for the intensive study of foreign missions.
5. That each Sunday School in the Conference adopt the plan of holding a short missionary program one Sunday each month, and that the offering for that Sunday go for missions.
6. That the *Christian Missionary* be taken in every home in the Conference.
7. That the Conference Secretary of Missions be instructed to secure the adoption of these recommendations by each Church.

The Sunday School work of our Conference is carried on through the Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Convention.

The last session of this Convention, held in May with the Church at Linville, was spoken of as one of the best Conventions we have ever held. The attendance was better than any we have on record. This shows that our Sunday School work is making progress, and that our leaders and workers are taking advantage of the benefit derived from attending these Conventions and our Conferences.

We wish to commend the Board of Religious Education and their efficient Field Secretary, Miss Pattie Coghill, for the splendid service they are rendering. They have a great responsibility and a broad field of service, and we should give them our hearty and united support in the good work.

We would urge that all our Sunday Schools strive to improve their music, especially by securing suitable song books, so that the children can be taught songs. One of the great needs in our Sunday School work today is teaching sacred songs to our children, and encouraging them in the work of the kingdom while they are young.

Therefore, we recommend to you the daily prayerful study of the Bible.

We deplore the lack of knowledge among the rank and file of our constituency as to the real and enlarged progress of the Christian Church. Likewise, we are convinced that too few of our "hidden treasures"—"diamonds among the rough," or so-called "small members"—are having too little to say as to the progress of the Church.

As a remedy for these deplorable conditions, we recommend *The Christian Sun* in every home in the Alabama Conference, that we may see what we are trying to do, and get first-hand knowledge as to how to direct our energies in a systematic, telling way. We endorse and appreciate the weekly letters in our Church paper by our college president, and urge a continuation of the same.

In conclusion, we recommend *The Herald of Gospel Liberty*, *The Christian Missionary*, and many valuable volumes now accessible in our college library.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Missions is the keynote to the saving of the world.

Truly, the mission spirit and thought should characterize every department of our Church work and activity.

The greatest Missionary the world has even known was the Lord Christ, and after He had solved the great mission problem He left it to His disciples and commanded them to carry it to all the world, even to every creature.

The Christian Church is not exempt from her part in carrying the gospel to all the world.

No Church or denomination can prosper without this missionary spirit, and a willingness to co-operate and assist in the carrying of this gospel.

All of us cannot go, but we can, and should, encourage and assist those who do go with our means and our prayers.

We, therefore, recommend:

That missions be taught in the Sunday Schools.

That collections of one Sunday of each month go to missions.

That we urge the prompt and full payment of our pledges to the Men and Millions Forward Movement.

That the pastor preach at least one sermon to each of his Churches during the year on missions.

That we raise next year \$150 for foreign missions.

REPORT OF MISSION BOARD.

Your Home Mission Board submits our annual report as follows:

We held our first meeting November 9, 1923, in the City Hall at Roanoke, Ala., at which time we provided for home mission interest in North Alabama, and also investigated some other points. We have employed for this year Rev. W. G. Meacham and Rev. J. W. Elder as home missionaries for the North Alabama section. These brethren have done excellent work, and our Church is growing in influence and importance in that section. This is practically a new country, and our Church has an opportunity to grow and develop as the country progresses. Our work there is of the very greatest importance to our Church, and demands our deepest interest and earnest consideration.

Let us put our home mission interest on our prayer list, and our help will be forthcoming. We have other fields open to us that are important. At Roanoke, Ala., we are striving to build, and some day, under the blessings of God, we will build a nice Church. At Lafayette, Ala., we have some good people who deserve our interest, and we ought to provide for them in a spiritual way, and it should be done immediately.

At Alexander City, Ala., we have a good membership, and it should be developed. At Birmingham and possibly many other places, excellent opportunities await us. Shall we rise up and take our stand for our dear old Church in our great State, or shall we sit still and lose our opportunity? It will take men and money to carry forward this program. We have the men, consecrated and intelligent, and we have the money, but we need to consecrate it to a holy use, and when we do, this old Christian Church will flourish like a palm tree and the cedars of Lebanon.

We desire to express our thanks to the Convention Board for help rendered in our work for the past year, and trust they may see their way clear to help us again this year. And we recommend that our Conference raise next year \$200 for Convention missions, and that we raise \$200 for Conference home missions.

SECOND DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference was called to order by the President.

Prayer by Rev. G. H. Veazey.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

We believe Christian education is essential to the progress of Christian civilization; that this is to be accomplished by the Church, through her own institutions.

The State is making wonderful development in literary, scientific and professional studies, but there seems to be a spirit of competition on the part of the State with the institutions of the Church which seek the development of the other needed faculties, viz: the Fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man; or, in other words, the spiritual and the social. It seems an injustice for the State to tax the people of the Church to operate its institutions and to teach, in some instances, subjects that are in direct opposition to that of the Church. There is a most-needed program adopted by the Church—that of Christian education. This program counts men and women of more value than mere learning. Already we are having fine results, which show the wisdom of its initiation.

The people are showing their appreciation of Bethlehem College by the patronage they are giving it. As a result, there are 100 students enrolled, with prospects for more to come. We heartily recommend the institution and its management, under the leadership of Rev. S. L. Beougher, Ph. D., is not surpassed.

At a recent session of the Southern Christian Convention, a resolution was passed that all the money raised in this and the Georgia and Alabama Conference is to go to Bethlehem. While your committee does not approve of sectionalizing the college, but inasmuch as this has been done, we are to do our very best in raising this item of Conference apportionments. We would not neglect Elon College, which has been such a help to our section. These are our institutions, and are deserving of our patronage in every way.

We heartily endorse the efforts of the trustees of Bethlehem College to meet the growing demands upon the institution. That we urge the people to pay their pledges to Men and Millions and to respond liberally to the call of the financial secretary.

We want to express our appreciation for the continued efforts of Revs. J. H. Dollar and M. A. Pollard, at Elon; also that of Rev. G. H. Veazey, in school at Bethlehem College this year.

We recommend that Bro. Carl Dollar, having been recommended by the Church at Rock Stant, be licensed as a probationer to preach the gospel wherever the providence of God may call.

That we request the North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference to ordain Rev. M. A. Pollard to the full work of the gospel ministry, he being in school at Elon and his Church work requiring his ordination.

That the licenses of Bros. B. L. Smith, L. J. Duke and E. T. Jean be continued another year.

That the name of T. J. Emory be dropped from our roll, he having joined another Church.

That we raise \$225 for education next year.

That a special collection be taken in each Church or Sunday School one Sunday in each quarter during the year for Bethlehem College.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS.

REV. JOHN WHITFIELD ELDER.

Rev. John Whitfield Elder was born January, 1862, in Chambers County, Ala., and died August 22, 1924. He was the son of Rev. J. D. Elder and was an older brother of Rev. H. W. Elder. He was married to Miss Nannie Floyd, also of Chambers County, who still survives him, and unto them were born nine children, six boys and three girls, eight of whom are still living, Hattie, the second daughter, having died some years past. Bro. Elder was licensed to preach in 1889, he having been in the ministry about thirty-five years. He was always genial and kind, numbering his friends by his acquaintances. A man of great influence and strong personality, a fine gospel preacher and an untiring worker. During his ministry he served the following Churches: Antioch, New Hope, Pleasant Grove, New Harmony, Longdale, Brown Springs, New Home, Macedonia and probably others, but perhaps the greatest work of his life was accomplished at Pisgah, in Jackson County, Ala., where for six years he labored to establish and build for himself and others a Church home in a new country and among strangers. This work will be a monument to his memory for generations to come. He lived, he labored, he sacrificed, and died, but not in the midst of strangers. Surrounded by a great gathering of bereaved friends, whose love was expressed by word and token, with our heads bowed and our hearts sad, we laid his form to rest to await the resurrection morn. His grave was literally covered with flowers. God bless his memory. His works will follow him.

REV. W. R. KNIGHT.

Rev. W. R. Knight was born January 2, 1844; died, January 16, 1924. He was eighty years and fourteen days old. Bro. Knight was engaged in the Christian ministry for more than forty years. He was an earnest, consecrated man of God, and was very energetic and enthusiastic in all his work. Bro. Knight was highly esteemed, especially by the older people of our Church. He came into our Conference in the pioneer days of its history, and always enjoyed the confidence and good will of the brotherhood. He served many of our Churches as pastor and assisted in the organization of quite a number of Churches in his day.

Bro. Knight was a man possessed of a great spirit, a loveable Christian character and a very friendly disposition; a self-sacrificing servant of God. He died in full assurance of faith, ready for his reward. We laid his tired, worn body to rest in the cemetery at Mt. Zion Church on the 17th day of January, 1924. Peace to his ashes, rest to his soul, and may joy fill the hearts of his loved ones who are left behind to mourn his departure.

REPORT OF CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR.

1. The organization of a Christian Endeavor Society in every Church in our Conference.

3. That we should take one monthly offering for missions; a yearly offering for religious education, Christian Orphanage, three for Bethlehem College, and the rest kept for local expenses.

A famous teacher in Baltimore has made the statement that, if given to her charge one generation, she would change the entire government of the United States, take it for Bolshevism or other forms of government. Why not, then, give to Christ one generation and take our own U. S. for Christ?

We feel that much may be done in a constructive way for the moral uplift of our people. No person is made good by being told he is bad. The Churches, through their various organizations for young people, should endeavor to hold up the pure moral life in its beauty and combat the evils of our day with a positive life of Christian activity.

Great things have already been brought about through the Church. For instance, their noble fight against our greatest enemy—strong drink. Our fight has not been won. We must pray for and endorse every movement, regardless of political affiliation, that tends to upbuild our institutions for the young.

Let Christian Endeavor be our motto.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

As we lift our eyes and look out upon the broad fields of our foreign mission work, we are made to realize the truth of these words: "The harvest truly is plenteous, but the laborers are few."—Matt. 9:37.

We, therefore, recommend:

1. That every pastor preach at least one sermon a year to each of their Churches in behalf of foreign missions, and that he also preach another on tithing.
2. That every Sunday School give one offering every quarter to be spent for missions.
3. That every Christian read his denominational papers and inform himself as to the great needs of this work, so that the Lord may lead us to be more liberal and sacrificial.
4. That we pray and do our best to take part in carrying the great commission of the Master, when he said: "Go, ye, into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

There has never been a day in the history of our country in which there has been such an effort put forth along the lines of education. We are heartily in sympathy with this effort, and heartily commend our people for this forward movement. Yet, we confess that there are some tendencies in our public schools and many of our colleges that we do not approve of, viz:

1. Athletics. We do not condemn athletics, but we do condemn match games of football, basket-ball, baseball and all other match games. There are no greater gambling schemes on the American platform than these games. We believe the Church ought to raise its voice in no uncertain sounds against these games.

2. There are things taught in many of our public schools and colleges that have a tendency to undermine the basic principles of religion—evolution, dancing, etc. We heartily recommend to our people to send their boys, girls and money to Bethlehem and Elon Colleges. We must not fail to patronize and support these schools.

We make the following recommendations:

(1) That Bros. Crowder, Brewer and Lankford be ordained to the full office of elders.

(2) That the ordination of Bros. Dean, Easterwood and Wilkinson be left in the hands of the standing Committee on Education.

(3) That the names of Denham, Tony and Vinson be dropped from our roll.

(4) That Paul House and J. A. Brooks be licensed as probationers to preach.

1. That we, as officials, co-operate together and get in touch with the pastors, and together undertake this work, which is very necessary and important in every Church. Though feeling that I have been deprived of this work this year, I am hoping and am anxious to assist in any way I may.

I am afraid that we, as a whole, do not stress missions enough in our Churches, and I feel that a great way to make a missionary spirit as it should be is to enlist our young people in the work.

I have received a check from Mrs. J. B. Hammond, at Enigma, Ga., which I present to the Conference at this time.

Judge Jesse F. West made a report as a special committee on selling the Old Lebanon Church lot, and, on motion duly seconded, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

1. Resolved, That it is the wish of the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference to sell the one acre of land, situated on the State highway No. 10, about two miles west of Surry Courthouse, in Surry County, Va., upon which Old Lebanon Church was located, except an area on the south side of the highway 41 by 61 feet, which is to be reserved as a monument site, a monument to be erected thereon which shall mark the exact location of Lebanon Church, in which, in 1794, the name "Christian" was adopted by Rev. James O'Kelly and his associates, when they founded the Christian Church.

2. Resolved, That the Trustees of this Conference, who have been heretofore appointed, by the Circuit Court of Surry County, trustees to hold the legal title to the one acre of land above mentioned, be, and are hereby, instructed to file their petition in the Circuit Court of Surry County, asking leave to sell to the State of Virginia a fifty-foot perpetual right of way across said land for State highway No. 10 for the sum of \$25.00, and to sell the residue of said one acre of land except said monument site, in two parcels, one on the north side for \$30.00, and the other on the south side of the State highway, together with a fifteen-foot right of way over the eastern side thereof for the sum of \$50.00.

3. Resolved, That the money realized from the said sales, after deducting the cost of securing a decree authorizing the sales and any expense incurred by the Committee on the Lebanon Memorial, be paid by said trustees to the treasurer of said committee to aid in the purchase and erection of a suitable monument on said reservation.

More Churches have preaching every Sunday, more pastorates are being formed, more parsonages are being built, and more and better Church buildings are being erected than in any period in the history of this Conference.

On condition that Cypress Chapel employ a pastor for at least three Sundays per month and begin by July 1, 1925, the erection of a Church building to cost not less than fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), we recommend an appropriation of two hundred and fifty dollars, on pastor's salary, payable one hundred and twenty-five dollars annually, if there is not a two hundred and fifty dollar balance after providing for appropriations to Christian Temple and South Norfolk.

We recommend the usual appropriation of \$1,000 to Christian Temple on building fund.

We recommend the usual appropriation of \$500 to South Norfolk on building fund, and that the Treasurer pay over to the South Norfolk Church this appropriation and the \$500 appropriation of 1923.

As this Conference was apportioned 40 per cent of the two million dollars financial goal of the Men and Millions Forward Movement, we submit herewith

certain interesting facts, prepared by the chairman of this committee. The financial goals were set at \$2,000,000, apportioned as follows:

The 1923 receipts of the Christian Missionary Association being less than for any year since 1916, we urge the taking of memberships by individuals, Churches, Sunday Schools, societies and Sunday School classes.

Discussion of report of foreign missions was resumed. On motion, the report was adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

We, the members of the Committee on Foreign Missions, respectfully submit the following report:

Missions is the great business of the Church of Jesus Christ. And we, who insist that "the Lord Jesus Christ is the only Head of the Church," and that "Christian is a sufficient name for the Church," must be about this, the Father's, and our Lord and Master's, business. We must be missionary or we cease to be Christians.

We thank God for what, by His grace, we have been able to accomplish during the past years, and especially during the past few years. We thank Him for the program of expansion which was launched last year, and which has been carried forward this year. We thank Him for the three fine young people who presented themselves to the recent board meeting at Dayton, and who were set apart to foreign mission service in Japan. And we take new courage as we think of the response which missions is receiving, both from those who give and from those who go.

But we regret to record that there is neither the money nor the workers adequate to meet the immediate and pressing need. At the same time that the three consecrated workers were accepted and set apart for mission work, several others, just as consecrated, were turned down because there were no funds to take care of them. And the Foreign Mission Board faces a marked, and to some extent disastrous retrenchment unless there be an increase in missionary gifts, adequate to take care of the work already established. Surely this is an occasion for heart-searching as to whether the Christian Church really does mean business. There is no bugle call for retreat in the Church militant. God has commanded us to go forward. That command still stands. We must obey or forfeit our right to be called His followers.

We make the following recommendations:

1. That the ministers of the Eastern Virginia Conference earnestly strive to develop in their own lives, and to emphasize in their ministry, the spirit of missions. A stream does not rise above its source, and our people will never become missionary in spirit until our ministers are possessed with the missionary passion. Missions should have a stated and generous place in the minister's list of subjects for the year.

2. That Churches, which do not have missionary societies, organize such societies, such societies to include adults, young people, children, and even the cradle roll.

3. That missionary societies emphasize the missionary spirit. There is a marked tendency to interpret missionary societies in terms of raising so much money for missions, rather than in developing the missionary spirit. The one ought to go hand-in-hand with the other. Missionary study classes and missionary education are vital factors in developing this essential spirit.

4. That the Sunday Schools in the Eastern Virginia Conference which are not devoting one offering a month to missions, do so, and that they do it in connection with a regular program that will create and develop the missionary spirit.

5. That a special effort be made to secure subscribers to the *Christian Missionary*, the missionary journal, of the Christian Church. A large part of our failure to glow and to give and to go is due to our failure to know. One of the best helps toward furnishing missionary facts is the *Christian Missionary*.

6. That special, definite and persistent intercession be made for missions and missionaries, not only in public services, but in private devotions. More things are wrought by prayer than this world dreams of. Prayer and missions are inseparable in the best sense.

7. That special effort be made to increase our gifts for missions, and that every legitimate means be employed to collect Men and Millions pledges.

The report of the Woman's Board was read by Mrs. L. W. Stagg, and, on motion, adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S BOARD.

We bring you today our twelfth annual report. At the close of the first year of our organized work, there were 12 organizations, a contribution of about \$300, and a membership of one less than 100. Today we come nearly 2,000 strong, with 77 organizations, and contributions amounting to \$5,809.00. This year the women gave \$1,659.00 to the Richmond work, and a like amount for the foreign special. The young people sent \$900.00 to the mountain work, and the same amount to the Santa Isabel field. The \$101.00 from the cradle roll was divided equally between the Baby Home and the Sendai Orphanage.

The April district meetings were again held with great success. An increased number of societies used the mission study books. A standard of excellence has been presented to the societies suggesting that a pennant be awarded at our annual Conference to the Woman's, Young People's, Willing Workers, and Cradle Roll Societies making the highest rating during the year.

The work will continue along the same lines of last year, with the exception of the foreign special for the women being used for the Japanese work instead of the China fund. Our goal for all departments is \$6,000.00.

We deeply regret that Mrs. C. H. Rowland, who has guided our work from the beginning, and made such a contribution to the entire Conference, had to resign because of having moved to Greensboro.

We appeal to you ministers today for your interest and support in our work, for when a pastor is filled with the spirit of missions, his people catch the vision.

Cartwright, Norfolk, Va.; Superintendent of Cradle Roll, Mrs. W. H. Baker, Newport News, Va.

It was moved and carried that the "History of the Eastern Virginia Christian Conference," as submitted by Mr. W. E. MacClenny, be printed at the expense of the Conference.

Conference adjourned for dinner. Benediction by Rev. J. G. Truitt.

SECOND DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference met at 2 o'clock. Prayer led by Rev. G. C. Crutchfield.

The report of the Committee on Religious Literature was read by Rev. B. F. Black, chairman. After discussion, the report was adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF RELIGIOUS LITERATURE COMMITTEE.

We, your Committee on Religious Literature, reiterate what has been offered in former reports: "Knowledge is power" for good or evil. The Bible is the Word of God or a myth. We believe it to be the Word of Almighty God, a lamp to our feet. Since "reading maketh a full man," we urge, therefore, that the Bible be read in every home daily, and that prayer be made to God to the end that the Holy Spirit interpret to our hearts the life-giving Word as we read it.

That while a speaker is able to be heard to the ends of the earth, nothing gives permanency to speech equal to the press. That nothing reaches so many as the printed page. We recognize *The Christian Sun* as the regional organ of the Southern Christian Convention, and it has the first claim to our support. We recommend also the *Herald of Gospel Liberty*, the *Christian Missionary*, and the *Journal of Christian Education*. This latter is in a class all its own, and may be described as "none such."

These publications are the advocates of the Church's activities, and should be circulated to the possible maximum.

It is imperative that plans be inaugurated to sustain not only *The Christian Sun*, but all our publications, and found others. As a non-missionary Church is dead, so a people without publicity is dumb and unknown to the world. This is designed to memorialize the authorities of our Church to stabilize our publications.

The report on moral reform was read by Rev. W. B. Fuller, and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM.

The Christian Church has always stood for moral reform. The movement that led up to the eighteenth amendment was started in a Christian Church in North Carolina. The anti-slavery movement started in one of our Churches in New England. The Christian Church was the first to begin teaching morals and religion through the newspaper, and the *Herald of Gospel Liberty* has continued to elevate the morals of mankind wherever its pages have been read. But our record of the past will not suffice for the present and the future. We have always been visionary and far-looking as a people. We always should be. He that puts his hands to the plow and looks back is not fit for the kingdom of heaven.

We believe that the greatest need of the world today is Jesus. Perhaps there has never been a time in the history of this nation when its people need to heed the teachings of Jesus Christ more than now. Too many Church members are content to fold their hands and apparently close their eyes while the

enemy of Jesus continues sowing tares in the minds and hearts of the youth of our land. We believe that the time has come and the hour has struck when we need to do more than just merely pass resolutions, listen to eloquent speeches, hear fine orations, sing lovely songs, shake hands and go home. When Jesus commissioned His disciples to go into all the world, He didn't say so much about passing resolutions, and shaking hands, but He said: "Heal the sick, cast out devils." Some resolutions and speeches are all right in their place, but the world pays little attention to words unless they are backed up by action. Through action, we need to convince the world that we have been with Jesus, and then lawlessness, intemperance, lust, gambling, dancing, profanity, divorces, broken homes and ruined lives will become fewer.

We offer the following resolution: That we study our Bibles, spend much time in secret prayer, thus inquiring the will of God; then, with all our mind, soul and strength, do and teach others to do God's will. There lies the hope that God and morality will flourish in our nation.

Rev. J. H. Lightbourne, president of the C. M. A., spoke on the association, and the following recommendations offered by him were adopted:

We recommend that the third Sunday in November be designated and observed as Christian Missionary Association Sunday in the bounds of our Conference.

That the ministers of our Conference hold themselves in readiness to carry out on that Sunday the plans and objectives of the Missionary Association.

It was moved and carried that Rev. J. O. Atkinson, secretary of stewardship of the S. C. C., be given twenty minutes to present the plans of the stewardship campaign.

It was moved and carried that the plan of the Stewardship Committee be adopted, designating November and December as months to present to the Churches the subject of stewardship.

It was moved and carried that the Trustees of Conference be empowered, upon the recommendation of the Ivor Christian Church, and upon the sale of a certain piece of land adjoining the Ivor Christian Church, to give a deed for said property when sold.

Report of Committee on Place for Next Session was submitted, and it was moved and carried that the invitation of Franklin Christian Church be accepted.

Report of Committee on Religious Education was read by Rev. J. H. Lightbourne, chairman, and, after discussion, was adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION COMMITTEE.

The interests of Christian education in our Conference are largely provided for by the Convention of Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies. However, a considerable and very effective missionary instruction is carried on by the Woman's Missionary Convention, and the various boards and departments of our Southern and General Conventions have access to the constituency of our Conference through the regular and special services of worship in the local Churches and through the columns of our Church papers.

In view of the rather extensive program of institutes carried out during the year 1922-23, the Board of Religious Education decided to send no field workers to our field during the year 1923-24 for general work. Mr. Eldredge was with the Christian Temple for one month, and with the People's Church, Dover, Del., for one week. Mrs. F. E. Bullock was with the People's Church, Dover, Del., for a little over one week. Field workers also visited, for local conferences, Suffolk, Newport News, Bethlehem and Holland. Some Churches and schools do not evidence any interest in such visits, and naturally the visits are not made.

The 1924 session of the Convention of Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies was held with the Bethlehem Church, and was in many particulars a successful session. The general attendance was overwhelming, and the official and delegated attendance represented 63 per cent of the membership strength of the Convention.

STATISTICAL EXHIBITS.

First: Attendance at Convention.—Officers 6, gain compared with 1922-23 2; elders 16, gain 2; superintendents 16, gain 1; Endeavor presidents 10, loss 1; Sunday School delegates 71, loss 3; Christian Endeavor delegates 15, loss 1—total enrollment 134, same.

Second: Sunday School Reports.—Scholars 5,769, gain compared with 1922-23 221; total enrollment 7,158, gain 121; average attendance 86, loss 5; converts 299, loss 94; uniting with Church 261, loss 74; missions \$1,722.88, loss \$130.52; Orphanage \$3,786.29, gain \$879.96; Convention dues \$900.70, gain \$67.50—total raised \$15,002.53; gain \$525.20.

The program of the session was institutional in character, and we feel interest was aroused in more thorough organization, closer grading and the use of graded literature in our schools. The Christian Endeavor interests were represented by Secretary W. H. Baker, and Christian Endeavor was given considerable prominence on the program. It is Mr. Baker's conviction that the ministers and the Churches of the Conference are not sufficiently interested in Christian Endeavor. During the Convention year, three new societies were organized, but in only four Churches is Christian Endeavor graded.

The support given the Elon Summer School by the ministerial and lay constituency of our Conference was inspirational. Sixteen of our ministers were in attendance, and eighteen of our Churches represented.

We feel attention should be directed to the provision made for educational work and social service in the new or remodeled Churches of Dover, the Christian Temple, Bethlehem and Oakland.

We wish to recommend:

1. The endorsement of the action of the Southern Christian Convention in providing for one offering per year, on the first Sunday of November, to the Department of Christian Education of the General Convention from the Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies of our Conference.
2. A more general and generous response by our Churches to the plan of receiving an offering on Children's Day each year for the Board of Religious Education of the Southern Christian Convention.
3. An increasing interest in and attendance upon the Elon Summer School.
4. The creation of a committee to consider the advisability of securing a field worker for our Conference to promote the work of Christian Education, missionary study and organization, Church finance and stewardship and Church extension. The committee to be composed of one member from each of the following organizations: the Woman's Missionary Convention, the Convention of S. S. & C. E. Societies, and the Executive Committee of the Conference, and two members at large. The committee to be appointed by the President. The committee to secure, through the proper authorities, the attitude of the Woman's Missionary Convention and the Convention of Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies, and to report at the 1925 session of the Conference.

5. A restudy of the recommendations offered and adopted at the last session of Conference.

Mr. W. H. Baker, president of the Virginia Christian Endeavor Union, was introduced to the Conference.

Report of Committee on Education was read by Dr. W. W. Staley, chairman, and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE.

Education grows apace. Never in the history of mankind have such programs, such investments, such numbers, and such curricula been undertaken in schools. The number of teachers is larger than the army and navy, and much more powerful, for they fashion the thought, the character, and the potential citizenship of the future. Education, in the present program, includes not only literary studies, but domestic and agricultural science, mechanical arts, economy and citizenship, music and professions, but religious life. Public schools, universities, technical colleges, professional schools, professional colleges of all sorts, many of them so heavily endowed as to offer free scholarships to students, invite students from all walks of life. Among these institutions are denominational colleges, which are the Church schools. These are supported by the denominations which they represent, and are essential to the perpetuity and development of the Churches.

Elon College is *our* college. It now has buildings and equipment equal to the best through the generosity of those whose gifts have made five great buildings stand where one stood before the great fire of January 18, 1923. But buildings alone do not make great institutions. Faculties and students, patronage and financial help, loyalty and prayer, enter into Church institutions as great factors of success. The Conference, not only by vote, but by attitude and influence at home, should think of Elon as ours and as worthy of our help.

But our committee brings a report, especially of the candidates, licentiatees, and students under our care. No special report can be given of H. C. Hainer, and Revs. Dennis F. Parsons, J. T. Harrod, and J. B. Chadwick, as no report has been received from them.

We submit the following recommendations:

1. That Revs. N. G. Newman, G. C. Crutchfield, J. G. Truitt, and F. C. Lester be received as elders into this Conference by letters of transfer from the North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference, and H. E. Truitt from the Mount Vernon Christian Conference, Ohio.

2. That Rev. V. T. Crawford be received as a licentiate from the Virginia Conference of the M. E. Church, South, and that he be ordained by this Conference.

3. That Rev. Jerry Nathaniel Cutchin, of Norfolk, be ordained at this session of Conference.

4. That Rev. T. Fred Wright, now a student in Elon College, be ordained as an elder.

5. That the following be admitted as candidates for the ministry.

(a) Howard Richardson, of Suffolk Church.

(b) Floyd D. Ballard, of First Church, Norfolk.

(d) Devaney Cooper, of Spring Hill Church.

(c) Richie Irvin Brittle, a member of Union, Surry.

6. That a loan of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) be granted Rev. T. Fred Wright to aid him in his expenses in Elon College.

Rev. E. T. Cotton has paid \$300.00 in full of his note, without interest; and T. J. Wright has paid his account of \$48.00 in the same way; and these sums are included in the cash item of Treasurer Woodward's report.

Rev. C. J. Felton had planned to pay his note of \$290.00 in full, but by mistake, after the Elon fire, he paid \$50.00 on his note to T. C. Amick, treasurer, and when that error is corrected, he will pay off his note.

All other debtors have been written to, but have not paid.

Report of Committee of Memoirs was read by Rev. James H. Lightbourne, and, on motion, adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS.

Your Committee on Memoirs reports as follows:

Three times since the 103d annual session of our Conference has the angel of death visited the ranks of our ministry. Twice it was to the homes of veterans, men who had lived their allotted threescore years and ten, and once to the home of one who was but across the threshold of maturity and usefulness.

On February 16th, at the age of 71 years, Rev. Harrison Holland Butler passed away at his home in Suffolk. He was born in Isle of Wight County, Va., was educated at the Suffolk Collegiate Institute, was licensed to preach by this Conference in 1878, was ordained an elder in 1879, and served actively within our bounds nearly forty-five years. His ministry was largely confined to the country, serving, in all, over twenty of our Churches with outstanding pastorates of twenty-three years at Cypress Chapel, and twenty-nine years at Antioch. His preaching was characterized by absolute loyalty to a literal interpretation of the Scriptures, and by an evangelistic fervor that frequently developed into Pentecostal proportions. His pastoral service was marked by a sympathetic approach and fellowship that endeared him to hundreds and won hundreds to loyal friendship. Funeral services, largely attended by relatives, friends and ministers, in spite of an all-day downpour of rain, were conducted at the Suffolk Christian Church by Dr. W. W. Staley.

On May 1st, while the Southern Christian Convention was in session in this Church, word was received of the death in Winston-Salem, N. C., of Dr. J. Pressley Barrett. His remains were brought to Suffolk, and funeral services, conducted by Dr. W. W. Staley in the Suffolk Christian Church, were attended by large numbers of the delegates and ministers in attendance at the Convention, besides the family and a host of friends and admirers from miles about Suffolk. Dr. Barrett was born in Isle of Wight County in 1852, was educated at the Suffolk Collegiate Institute and Richmond College, was licensed to preach by this Conference in 1873, and ordained in 1874, and was a member of the Conference for fifty years. He was an interesting and effective preacher, a brilliant editor and a constructive leader, few men among us having equaled his splendid record of service in behalf of his beloved Church. He was an

author, and our Church owes him an eternal debt of gratitude for his religious romance, "Iola Graham." He was an editor and edited the *Herald of Gospel Liberty* for twelve years, and our *Christian Sun* for thirteen. He was an educationist, and his name is intimately associated with the beginning of our Elon. He was a great missionary, a pioneer of the foreign movement among our people. He was the successful pastor of many of our Churches. He was, above all, the man of utter loyalty to the still small voice of his conscience.

On May 4th, his thirty-fourth birthday, occurred the death at the Lakeview Hospital, Suffolk, of Rev. George D. Eastes. Funeral services were conducted by the writer at the Holland Christian Church, May 7th; services were made peculiarly impressive by the grief and sorrow manifested by his parishoners of Holy Neck. He was a Hoosier, a son of Indiana, raised in the evangelical faith, interested in our principles by Dr. W. D. Samuel, a former President of the American Christian Convention, and by him directed to the consideration of the pastorate of the Third Christian Church, Norfolk, Va. He later served the Raleigh Christian Church, and at his death was pastor of the Holy Neck Church. He was, however, chiefly known as the evangelist and was happiest when in the service of winning sinners for the Christ. His was a sweet, spiritual character, with a winsomeness of personality that won for him the love and friendship of hundreds.

We feel recognition also should be given Dr. William Samuel Long, whose death August 3d saddened the closing days of our Elon Summer School. In other years he was a pastor in our Conference, and as first president of Elon College and president of the Southern Christian Convention, he rendered us invaluable service. His funeral was conducted by Dr. W. W. Staley on August 4th from the New Providence Christian Church, Graham, N. C.

These have gone from us. We cannot bring them back, but, blessed be God, we can look forward with lively hope through Christ to going to them. This note of Christian assurance and joy we herald to the four widows and many sons and daughters and relatives of these noble men.

1. That the work expressed in the reports and addresses to this Conference is far in advance of the daily devotional as rendered at these sessions with special mention of the type of service. We recommend that the Conference specialize in this kind of service each year.

2. That special commendation be given the Program Committee for the arrangement of such profitable material as has been presented, and that we commend the plan of the daily devotional as rendered at these sessions with special mention of the type of service. We recommend that the Conference specialize in this kind of service each year.

3. That the gratitude of the Conference be extended the officers, committeemen and all who have contributed to the success of the program, and that the Secretary of the Conference thank the daily papers for the publicity given to our deliberations.

4. That we reaffirm our endorsement of the Men and Millions Movement and pray for full collections.

5. That, whereas the Webster Community Christian Church, of Delaware, was to have been formerly received into the fellowship of the Conference; and whereas conditions in the Church and community prevent the pastor, Rev. W. W. Sutcliff, and their delegates from attending; and whereas the Church is represented by official letter from the pastor—be it resolved:

(a) That the Webster Community Christian Church, of Havre de Grace, Md., is hereby a member of this Conference and subject to the rules and regulations of the same.

REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION BOARD.

Whereas, there remains yet unpaid one note of \$550.00, with interest at 6 per cent since July 1, 1922, as an obligation of the Home Mission Board of the North Carolina Christian Conference, and also a balance of \$525.00, with interest at 6 per cent since December 12, 1923, is due by that same board on the Willis J. Tharrington notes; and whereas the legal dissolution of the said North Carolina Christian Conference cannot take place until all financial obligations are paid, therefore, we recommend that this Conference direct the Treasurer thereof to pay all home mission funds that may be to his credit at the close of this session over to the Treasurer of the Home Mission Board of the North Carolina Christian Conference, to aid in liquidating the indebtedness of that board.

We recommend, further, that this Conference reaffirm its decision of a year ago, whereby it was affirmed that the home mission funds of this Conference, after the indebtedness above designated shall have been discharged, shall be administered through the Mission Board of the Southern Christian Convention.

We advise further that this Conference, through its officers and ministers, be alert to any opportunity for home mission work within its bounds; that our full duty, as a Conference, in this part of kingdom service may not be neglected.

REPORT OF FOREIGN MISSION COMMITTEE.

From information received from our Mission Secretary, Dr. W. P. Minton, we report that the year just closed might well be described as a year of reconstruction. Not only has this been true in the matter of buildings, but in the methods of work, on both the foreign fields, our missionaries have wrought exceedingly well. We record the impression that on both fields the work is more thoroughly organized than it ever was before, and that the sympathetic cooperation between missionaries and national workers is even more pronounced than heretofore. This commends to us the constructive type of work our missionaries are doing, and points to greater achievements in the future. We thank God for all that has been accomplished in His name. The Christian Church has made a gain of more than one hundred per cent since we entered the foreign field. Therefore, be it resolved:

1. That we give better support to our foreign mission work.
2. That each Church be requested to have a mission-day service—a sermon or an address, songs, recitations, etc.
3. That our people take and read the *Christian Missionary*.

In view of the great opportunity of the Church, and the great need of the world, we make the following recommendations:

1. We recommend that all ministers and all devoted Christians give prayerful and careful study to national and international problems, and seek to give them a thoroughly Christian interpretation.

2. That this Conference go on record as opposed to war and to all movements which tend to war and militarism, and resolve to definitely set itself to create sentiment against such as well as against all those things which would create friction among nations.

3. That this Conference set itself back of law enforcement without qualification. The eighteenth amendment and all other laws of the land demand our obedience and our support as citizens of the country.

4. That this Conference counsel classes for the study of racial and international relations with a view to building a Christian civilization.

5. That this Conference does hereby condemn the use of the cigarette by the youth of the land. That we urge our people to respect the Sabbath, and that we condemn all forms of Sabbath desecration.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS.

DR. WILLIAM SAMUEL LONG.

William Samuel Long was born in Alamance County, near Graham, N. C., on October 22, 1839, and fell on sleep Sunday afternoon, August 3, 1924, in a hospital at Sanford, N. C., to which he had been carried following an automobile accident on the Wednesday before. The burial services were conducted from the New Providence Christian Church, Graham, N. C., by Rev. W. W. Staley, D. D., a life-long friend, assisted by other ministers and the president of Elon College, and the interment was at the Graham Cemetery on Monday, August 4th, at 4 P. M. Thus passed to his reward one of the outstanding men of our Church and one whose name will be revered among us for many generations to come.

While Dr. Long served many of our pulpits as a faithful and honored pastor, the superlative achievement of his life was the founding of Elon College, to which he gave the best energy and the deepest devotion of his stalwart life. President W. A. Harper, in speaking of Dr. Long on the day of the funeral at Graham, very truthfully said: "When William Samuel Long took charge of Graham Normal College, a new day dawned for higher education in his county and Church. Graham Normal College came to full flower when, under the leadership of Dr. Long, Elon opened her doors on September 2, 1890. The man who dreamed Elon College before there was an Elon, and who made his dream a reality, could be no ordinary man.

"And now this noble Christian warrior sleeps with his fathers, but his spirit will live on in the lives of his family and friends whom his great life touched for good, and in the college which his heart conceived and his genius founded. His spirit of undaunted faith, of invincible consecration, of terrific energy well spent, we veritably believe characterizes Elon College till this day, and will continue to characterize it in the years that are to come. His spirit is stamped on the college he founded. His spirit is incarnate there."

His name is venerated by many whom he taught in the class-room, and by hundreds whom he helped in his ministry. The refined dignity and Christian graces of his cultured spirit are traits that stand out prominently as we think of him today, and the impress of his life remains indelibly fixed on the minds and hearts of hundreds in this and in other Conferences. We feel that a true and loyal and faithful soldier of the cross has gone to his reward. While we mourn his going, we strengthen ourselves with the hope and the determination to try to carry on, to the honor of his memory, the work which he so nobly

began, and to which he gave the efforts, the energies, and the devotions of a noble life.

Be it resolved, That a copy of this memorial be sent to his widow, Mrs. Mittie Ames Long, Chapel Hill, N. C., together with our sympathy and our prayers for her strength and guidance, and that a copy be spread upon our minutes.

On motion, the said committee was continued, with instructions to act as developments shall warrant.

Under the direction of Mrs. Chas. D. Johnston, a group of girls from the Christian Orphanage presented an excellent musical program.

Superintendent Chas. D. Johnston spoke on "The Needs, Responsibilities, and Opportunities of the Orphanage."

An offering of \$23.25 was taken for the Orphanage.

Dr. C. H. Rowland addressed the Conference on the subject, "Men and Millions Movement."

Dr. W. S. Alexander preached a sermon from the text, "For Me to Live is Christ; to Die is Gain."

THIRD DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference called to order at 1:30 P. M. by President.

Devotional service conducted by Rev. J. A. Ledbetter.

On motion, Rev. Stanley C. Harrell was elected a member of the Home Mission Board for a term of four years.

Rev. J. S. Carden, reporting for the Committee on Place of Meeting, stated that the Conference had received invitations from Salem Chapel, Happy Home, Ingram, Lebanon, and First Church, Greensboro, to hold the next session with them, and recommended that the Conference accept the invitation of Happy Home Church.

By motion, the Conference voted unanimously to hold the next session at Salem Chapel.

The Budget Committee reported as follows:

REPORT OF BUDGET COMMITTEE.

We reiterate our recommendation of last year, namely: that the Secretary of the Conference notify each Church in writing immediately following this session of the amount which it is suggested it should raise for Conference next year; that this amount be voted on by the Church and raised through a local budget, using the every-member canvass and the envelope system of payment; that the amount voted to be raised by the Church for the Conference be remitted quarterly to the Treasurer of the Conference on February 1st, May 1st, August 1st, and November 1st; and that the Mission Secretary of the Southern Christian Convention be asked to aid our Churches in making this plan effective.

We recommend that 20 per cent of the Conference fund be paid the North Carolina Christian Conference for its expenses.

We recommend that the Secretary of the Conference endeavor to get any Church not remitting at the Conference session to send him its remittance, and that he include the same in the Collector's report.

We further recommend that the Secretary percentage all funds in hand and draw a draft to the proper persons and officials, and that he likewise pay from the Conference fund all expense accounts approved by this Conference.

SUNDAY SCHOOL BENEVOLENCES.

We are thoroughly of the opinion that the Church should pay all the expense of operating the Sunday School as a part of the current expense of the Church, and that all the offerings of our Sunday Schools should be given for benevolences. We would suggest one Sunday a month each for missions, for the Orphanage, for religious education, and for our colleges, the fifth Sundays' offerings to be used for local benevolences and charity. There should be a definite effort in connection with these benevolent offerings to have the children at their Sunday School classes or departmental exercises give intelligently for these purposes, and the different boards of the Church should be asked to furnish information of an educational character to be used in connection with these offerings. We are of the opinion, further, that the children, either at the regular or the junior Church, should be furnished envelopes in which they may make contributions to the support of the Church as such. We believe that this method of systematic giving through the Church budget will mean a new era of progress and prosperity and a new sense of stewardship for the years to come. We do not recommend this now for every Church, but we suggest and urge that our Missionary Secretary select one or two Churches in which this plan may be tried out and the results reported at the next session of Conference.

SOUTHERN CHRISTIAN CONVENTION BUDGET.

The Southern Christian Convention requests this Conference to approve, as its part of the general budget of the Southern Convention, an allotment of \$6,000.00. This allotment will not go into effect until one year from this fall.

We recommend that the action of the Southern Christian Convention be approved, and that this committee be authorized to apportion the same to the Churches in the suggested budget at the 1925 session of this Conference.

Ministerial letters and Church reports were read.

Moved and carried that this Conference provide separate blanks for ministerial reports.

The Collector reported the amount collected from the Churches as \$3,639.59. For the amount paid by each Church, see statistical table.

The Committee on Superannuation reported as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUPERANNUATION.

We recommend the following as those who, in this Conference, should receive the favorable consideration of the Board of Superannuation, to share in the benevolence of our superannuation fund: Rev. J. W. Wellons, Rev. P. T. Klapp, Mrs. L. I. Cox, Mrs. C. C. Peel, Mrs. W. S. Long, and Mrs. J. W. Holt.

We recommend that, in keeping with a vote of the Southern Christian Con-

vention at its recent session, that this Conference make its superannuated fund 10 cents per member instead of 5 cents per member, as at present.

Committee on Christian Endeavor made its report. Christian Endeavor demonstration given by Miss Madge Moffitt.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR.

There is nothing more needful than trained leadership. The Christian Endeavor's main object is the training of the masses of our young people for service in the Church. We ought to have a live Christian Endeavor in every Church in the Western North Carolina Christian Conference. The real necessity is to feel responsible for a certain task which is confronting us and to feel responsible that we are our brothers' keeper and that we are responsible in full measure as to the mental and spiritual development of our young people.

The report of the Woman's Board was made, and, after discussion, was adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF WOMAN'S BOARD.

The woman's work of this Conference during the past year has been along the same general lines as heretofore. Though we have not accomplished all that we had hoped for, we have endeavored to encourage mission study, organize societies where there were none, and to increase a larger interest in the work in general. We held one missionary rally at Pleasant Ridge Church during the summer. There was a good attendance, with both instructive and inspiring missionary messages.

We realize that a world vision of service is needed in our Conference, and that we need to develop more world Christians. We know that missions is not a side line of religion, but it is the spirit around which centers the entire work of Christianity. We urge that our young people be taught the spirit of Christ, who loved all people, regardless of race or condition. We know that the women of the Christian Church have had a great part in the mission work of our Church; therefore, we recommend:

(1) That the Conference appoint one or more women in each Church to take it upon herself to increase the mission interest in her local Church and organize where societies are needed.

(2) That all our people pray definitely for the mission cause, our Mission Boards, and the great body of the Church, that there may come to us all a larger missionary vision.

(3) We would suggest the importance of a definite, well-defined missionary program in each Church of our Conference, with an annual every-member canvass, and with regular, systematic offerings for missions.

(4) That all missionary societies are urged to study our mission book on China, "Ming Whong." This is a true story of real life in China, and the study of the book will create interest in the society throughout the entire year.

(5) That the pastors co-operate with the women and render them all the assistance possible in making this work a greater success.

(6) That more of our people subscribe to *The Christian Missionary*.

Devotional service conducted by Rev. W. J. Edwards.

Dr. W. A. Harper and Prof. P. J. Kernodle were asked to act as Press Committee.

Miss Gertrude Brown, secretary to Dr. J. O. Atkinson, was introduced to Conference.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

There is an ever-increasing interest in the cause of education throughout our country, and in the Church is found an ever-widening appreciation of

Christian education for all our people as well as for those who are to engage definitely in Christian service. This is cause for gratitude and thanksgiving, for as the vision of the Church widens in the direction of a more thoroughly trained leadership, both in pulpit and pew, a more zealous and determined effort will arise looking toward a larger, fuller support of our educational institutions and enterprises, at the same time making a more vigorous, persistent and continuing endeavor to enlist our young people in study in our college, summer schools for training Christian workers, and all the educational activities of the Church.

We rejoice in the splendid growth and magnificent achievements at Elon College during the past year. The rebuilding program that was under way a year ago has gone forward steadily and in a very fine way until now the major portion of this rebuilding program is nearing completion, and when completed we shall have there one of the most beautiful, most commanding, well-appointed and splendidly equipped college plants in the State. The college should appeal more and more to our people as the one logical place where our sons and daughters should go for their higher education.

We would call especial attention to the fine work now being done by the Department of Christian Education of the General Convention of our Church. At the Burlington Convention of our Church in 1922, or just two years ago, it was voted to constitute the board herein named whose business it should be to head up, co-ordinate and integrate all the educational activities and agencies of the Church. Most gratifying achievements have attended the efforts of the board during this time. As evidence of the fine and growing usefulness of this board, the following facts are cited: four full-time educational secretaries are now giving themselves to this phase of our Church life, the summer training schools that were already in operation have been greatly strengthened and their field of usefulness greatly extended, with other schools organized and set in motion with the same end in view, thus substantially strengthening the educational forces of the Church. And it should be remembered also that the pleasing sum of \$30,000 has been put into the treasuries of our colleges through the efforts and service of this department. The annual offering asked of all our Churches for this work should, therefore, be stressed by all our pastors, Sunday School superintendents, and Church leaders in general, beginning with the call that is now on and continuing until the funds realized shall amply supply the urgent needs of the work undertaken.

Recommendations:

1. Bro. J. U. Fogleman, a student in Elon College, having made application to your committee for licensure to preach, and having been recommended by the Church of which he is a member, has been duly examined and is recommended that he be licensed during the present session of Conference.
2. That Bros. D. R. Moffitt and V. D. Shepherd be licensed during this session of Conference, and that Bro. W. C. Martin be ordained as an elder.
3. That Bro. R. I. Williams continue his Bible studies; that Bro. W. L. Owens be admitted to the biblical class, and that they report themselves to the next annual session of this Conference. Licentiates E. C. Brady and W. B. Terrell have failed to report themselves to this committee.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM.

Your Committee on Morals beg to submit:

That long reports on reformation in morals can never produce ideal living. This work in morals must be constructive. It must be wrought in the homes, in the child-life, and from the pulpit.

1. That our pastors and Church leaders exert a greater effort in instilling high ideals in the minds and hearts of the girls and boys, and in teaching them that the religion of Christ is a practical thing.

2. That the Church realize more fully that it exists to live among men and to serve them, and that its duty is to minister to the whole life.

3. That we lend the strongest effort possible for the enforcement of our just and righteous laws, which are so vital to a safe and trustworthy government today.

4. That we, as a Church, strive to live closer to Christ, and that our attitude toward the moral conditions of our time be expressed by the sincerity of our lives and in a serious effort to help improve conditions in our community, State and nation.

(3) We recommend, further, that all Sunday Schools in this Conference, when practicable, organize and maintain teacher-training classes. We also recommend that our own literature be used by all of our schools.

Very little change has been made in the foreign fields since our last annual Conference. Our people are not as interested in the evangelization of the world as we should be, but there is growth along this line, for which we are grateful.

Our work in Japan has suffered on account of the effects of the earthquake, but the lives of all our missionaries were preserved, for which we return devout thanks to God.

Our work in Porto Rico seems to be growing in interest among the inhabitants of the island.

We recommend the following:

1. That all our Sunday Schools give one offering per month for missions.

2. That we show our appreciation for the work the Woman's Board is doing.

3. That our pastors be asked to co-operate with them in organizing missionary societies in all our Churches.

4. That our people be urged to read *The Christian Sun* and *The Christian Missionary*.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL SERVICE.

God has formed men with different powers and faculties, and placed them under different circumstances, that they might be able to promote each other's good. Some are wiser, richer and stronger than others, that they may direct the conduct, supply the wants, and bear the burdens of others.

Society is the only field where the sexes meet on the terms of equality; the arena where character is formed and studied; the cradle and realm of public opinion; the crucible of ideas; the world's university; the power that gives the Church an opportunity in fixing the moral sense of the people. But all social duties are reciprocal. Society is far more apt to pay its dues to the individual than the individual is to society. A man may contemplate virtue and solitude in retirement, but the practical part consists in its participation and the social service it renders, for whatever is good is better for being communicated. You cannot move men until you show yourself one among them. You cannot know their wants and needs until you have mingled with them.

A consciousness of these facts has moved our modern Church people to provide social amusement rooms and other places for social amusement. This is well, provided all social amusements of an immoral, worldly nature are excluded. We will never win the world to Christ by yielding to the demands of the sinful social world. Any religious gathering that gives opportunity for an expression or exchange of ideas should be advocated.

Therefore, we strongly recommend the Christian Endeavor Society, the Sunday School, the Workers' Council, the Workers' Federation, etc. These religious gatherings will give an opportunity for social service, and such service will meet the requirements of men and be acceptable to God.

2. That each Church have a committee on religious literature, whose duties shall be to study the local needs in regard to religious literature and to devise and prosecute plans for satisfying such needs.

3. That said committee, in pursuance of its duties—

(1) Have a "Church-Paper Day" some time during the year, at which time the local field shall be canvassed for subscriptions and renewals to *The Christian Sun*, *The Herald of Gospel Liberty*, and *The Christian Missionary*.

(2) That, acting as purchasing agent, said committee provide itself with sample copies of a few of the religious books most needed in the local field, selecting the same from classified list by the Christian Publishing Association; and that such samples be displayed on the regular Church days; and that catalogs or pamphlet price lists of books carried by our publishing house be distributed among prospective buyers.

(3) That said committee give due diligence to the work of acquainting the members of the Church and others who are interested, with the "Government and Principles of the Christian Church" through the distribution of such pamphlets as the "Origin and Principles of the Christians," by Rev. J. F. Burnette.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

It is said, "Charity begins at home"—so does missions. But we must not begin and stop there; we must move on. We are to be witnesses "in Jerusalem" first, then in "all Judea and Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the earth." Unless the home field rallies, we will be slow in going to the ends of the earth. We, therefore, urge hearty co-operation in prayer, that God will send forth laborers into the harvest and material equipment with which to carry on the work at home.

While we are making some gain, we believe there is room for improvement. We rejoice that in many of our Churches there have been successful and encouraging revivals during the year, and we believe that when complete reports from all our Churches are had that a substantial increase in membership will be seen. While no new Church has been organized this year, we are glad to report that several Church buildings have been enlarged or completed, with others under way of construction, and a handsome new Church has been erected at Raleigh.

One of the most serious things to be considered in the home field is that some of our Churches are without pastors. Unless this can be remedied, the home work must fail to grow, and thereby cripple the work elsewhere. We believe that our means of relief would be to group the Churches.

We recommend that all the money collected for home missions by this Conference be paid to the Treasurer of the North Carolina Conference.

Report of Committee on Foreign Missions read by J. Fuller Johnson. After an address by Dr. J. O. Atkinson on "Foreign Missions," the report was adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

When Jesus said, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature," He referred to us of this day as well as to the disciples of His day; and to carry out this command is not a burden, but a blessing. This Conference has no missionary on the foreign field. If it did have one, we would today be doing more for our home enterprises. We may think that the command of Jesus is burdensome and grievous, but it is the way of righteousness, peace and truth. This Conference will never do its best work, nor come into its real strength and privilege until it has on the foreign field one or more missionaries.

Our foreign work is confined to Japan and Porto Rico. The Garmons, Woodworths, McKnights, Miss Stacy and Miss Angie Crew are our representatives in Japan who are now assisted by scores of native pastors and workers. In Porto Rico we have the Barretts, the Mortons, Miss Olive Williams, and many native workers. These we should support with our gifts, our acquaintances and our prayers.

We recommend, first, that we urge every Church to have a Woman's and Young People's Missionary Society, and where it is impossible to do this we urge some woman to use the mite-box in the Church for the Woman's Missionary work.

Second, that we urge all our Sunday Schools to have missionary Sunday once a month, and each school take one offering each month for missions.

Third, that we urge our ministers and other leaders to preach and teach missions in keeping with our Lord's most emphatic command, "Go ye into all the world."

Fourth, that our people be urged to subscribe for and read *The Christian Missionary* magazine; it is 50 cents a year, Rev. W. P. Minton, editor, Dayton, Ohio.

Fifth, that this Conference be urged to put forth every possible and praiseworthy effort to become missionary in spirit and activity.

Convention was held at New Elam Christian Church, the second week in July, and declared by many to be a success; and yet our records will show a loss over the previous year in attendance—11 Churches, 33 delegates, 5 superintendents, and 5 pastors. At this Convention the following officers were elected for the coming year: C. H. Stephenson, President; H. W. Johnson, Vice-President; J. Fuller Johnson, General Secretary; A. H. Hook, Corresponding Secretary, and L. L. Vaughan, Treasurer—which constitutes the Executive Committee. The election of departmental secretaries, time and place of next meeting was left in the hands of this committee.

Today the Sunday School and Christian Endeavor forces of the Eastern North Carolina Conference faces a new era. Great possibilities are ahead of us. The division of the State Convention, whether wise or unwise, gives greater opportunity for individual service, and to this end we recommend:

RALEIGH, N. C., NOVEMBER 24-26, 1924.

FIRST DAY—EVENING SESSION.

Mrs. L. L. Vaughan reported, as follows, for the Woman's Mission Board:

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSION BOARD.

We feel that our work is having a steady and healthy growth, as you will see from reports herein submitted. This past year showed improvement, and thirty woman's societies sent in funds to our Conference Treasurer, which was a gain of six over the previous year; ten Young People's Societies, which was a gain of one; nine Willing Workers, and nine Cradle Rolls, a gain of three. The amount of money raised this past year was \$3,290.56, the previous year being \$2,665.52—a gain of \$625.04. Our goal for the coming year is \$3,600.00.

During the year eight one-day schools of missions were held, with gratifying results, and these will be continued this year.

The report on religious literature was submitted by Rev. J. Lee Johnson, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

Since the Bible is the Book of books, and since on its foundation civilization stands and the Church of God is built and grows, we therefore recommend once more that the Word of God be read and studied in the home, and indeed be made our rule of faith and practice. We further recommend and stress a more loyal support to *The Christian Sun*. We deem it prudent on the part of our Church to show their appreciation to the staff of editors, who are serving us gratis, by securing a greater number of subscriptions to our Church paper.

We recommend *The Herald of Gospel Liberty*, the organ of publicity of the General Convention of the Christian Church; *The Christian Missionary*, our medium of information concerning missions; *The Teachers' Journal*, for teachers, and *Journal of Christian Education*, for instruction in this line of work.

Once more we recommend a wholesale distribution of "Origin and Principles of the Christian Church," by Burnette.

Prof. P. J. Kernodle addressed the Conference on "Enlarging the Orbit of *The Christian Sun*."

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to draw order on the Treasurer for \$6.00 in favor of Central Publishing Company for printing 500 copies of programs.

The Home Mission Board reported as follows:

REPORT OF HOME MISSION BOARD.

Your Board of Home Missions held a meeting following last session of the North Carolina Conference and ordered the payment of the note due on the North Clayton appropriation and the application of the balance on hand to the Tharrington debt.

Dr. J. O. Atkinson, Mission Secretary, recommended the sale of the Goshen Chapel title at such equitable price as might be agreed upon.

A second meeting was held Monday, November 24th, and a motion was passed that the final note of the North Clayton work be paid in full, and the balance collected from the Conferences, together with the hundred dollars received from the Goshen Chapel title, be applied to the debt held by W. J. Tharrington, and that the Conference raise the balance necessary to take up the W. J. Tharrington note.

The total debt is \$1,173.81. The N. C. & Va. Conference reports \$437.40; the Western N. C. Conference, \$227.57; the Eastern N. C. Conference, \$283.50; Goshen Chapel fund, \$100.00. Balance on hand, \$24.73; balance necessary to close the account, \$100.61.

The Committee on Christian Union reported, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN UNION.

Jesus prayed for the union of His followers. The Christian Church came into being to promote Christian union. Its five cardinal principles are designed as a platform on which all followers of Christ can unite on a basis of brotherhood and democracy.

We would endorse every interdenominational organization that aims to bring Christians of all names and orders together in co-operative effort. We especially endorse the Federal Council of Churches of Christ as representing a most effective form of united effort on the part of the various evangelical denominations.

We have one recommendation to make, and urge its adoption: That our Committee on Curricula for our Sunday Schools be petitioned to use the last Sunday of each quarter to present the principles of our Church, of Christian stewardship, and of Christian union, for study in our Sunday Schools, substituting these lessons for the regular quarterly reviews.

The report on Church polity was presented, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH POLITY.

We find that this Conference must continue as a corporation till all its obligations on local Churches, covered by mortgage, are fully discharged. We, therefore, recommend that we meet in annual session till this condition is met.

We further recommend that this Conference meet next year for a two-day session on Wednesday after the first Sunday in December, and that after ratifying the acts of the three constituent Conferences, this Conference give itself to inspirational and forward-looking discussion of missions, stewardship, Christian union, and Christian education.

We further recommend that we undertake, through our Mission Board, the reorganization of a Christian Missionary Association in the bounds of this Conference; that the constituent Conferences be urged to co-operate in this association, and that it meet annually in connection with this Conference.

We further recommend that, in their respective territories, the constituent Conferences each exercise all the functions of Conference according to the "Principles and Government of the Christian Church," subject to ratification by this Conference.

We further recommend that each Conference vote this Conference 10 per cent of its Conference fund.

We further recommend that a special committee be appointed to provide a centennial celebration of the organization of the Christian Church in North Carolina at our next session.

We further recommend the following persons as members of the Mission Board: W. C. Wicker, ex-officio, W. P. Lawrence, J. O. Atkinson, W. K. Holt,

and K. B. Johnson; and that this board begin at once to plan for the erection of a centennial Church at some point within the bounds of this Conference.

We further recommend that the Churches and ministers of this Conference make their annual reports and send all funds to the local Conferences in which they are situated, and that the membership of this Conference consist of all ordained ministers holding membership in the three constituent local Conferences, and the Churches of the said Conferences represented by delegates of their choosing according to the "Principles and Government of the Christian Church," it being understood that the delegates of a local Church chosen to represent it in the local Conference are also the delegates to this Conference unless the local Church shall elect other delegates to represent it in this Conference.

The Committee on Foreign Missions reported, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Our Foreign Mission Department sent out five missionaries the past year—three to Porto Rico, and two to Japan. We also undertook a large building program, and a program of expansion in Japan and Porto Rico. This was necessitated in Japan because of two earthquakes there a year ago which damaged and destroyed our properties there to the extent of nearly \$50,000.00. In Porto Rico we finished, paid for, and dedicated the beautiful Santa Isabel Church.

This building program and the sending out of five missionaries in addition to the number already on the field have combined to create a large deficit in this department of our work. We now have under appointment and ready to be sent out three very promising missionaries—one man and two young women. But unless our resources are increased we will have to retrench rather than expand further. This ought not to be allowed. One of the perils of progress is financial embarrassment. Larger tasks and opportunities require larger resources. We are not increasing in our gifts to missions in proportion to the larger demands upon us, and the larger opportunities opening up to us on the foreign field.

We recommend:

1. Missionary Sunday at least once per month in all our Sunday Schools.
2. A greater emphasis in our Church services on the great commission.
3. That our people take and read *The Christian Missionary*, published at Dayton, Ohio.
4. That we urge organized Sunday School classes and our Churches to purchase and hang up in conspicuous places in their halls and auditoriums, missionary maps and charts showing the needs and opportunities on the mission fields.

On motion, the report on foreign missions was adopted.

Holt during his active ministry; and providing that the North Carolina Christian Conference elect three trustees to administer the loan fund.

THIRD DAY—MORNING SESSION.

The Conference was called to order at 9:30 A. M. by the President. Devotional services conducted by Dr. G. O. Lankford.

On recommendation of the Committee on Education, Bro. A. R. Brothers, a member of the Raleigh Church, was ordered licensed as a probationer.

Dr. G. O. Lankford licensed Bro. A. R. Brothers as a probationer to preach the gospel wherever the providence of God might call him, but not to administer the sacraments.

Report of Committee on Education follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

GENERAL MATTERS.

1. We call attention to the splendid growth, progress and development at Elon College that is evident in the rebuilding program which is now nearing completion. The faith, loyalty, generosity and labor that have made this achievement possible should serve as an inspiration to all our people, at the same time challenging them to a more loyal support and larger patronage of this institution of our Church.

2. We would urge a thoughtful consideration on the part of our people, and particularly of our Church leaders, of the fine and fruitful work being done by the Department of Christian Education of the General Convention of our Church. Perhaps no agency has arisen among us in recent years that has accomplished so much in so short a time and promises greater things for the future of our work. The offerings from our Churches to this department should be made as large as possible. Funds invested here give assurance of large and gratifying returns in the future of our educational activities.

3. We suggest that exceeding care should be exercised by our ministers in conserving their time and strength for as much intensive study as the circumstances of their work will allow. The age in which we live is demanding more and more a well-trained, thoroughly prepared, forward-looking ministry, and the minister who expects to keep going must keep growing.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR.

For the past six years the North Carolina Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Convention has showed by its statistics a slow but steady and wholesome growth in numbers, attendance, zeal, and enthusiasm.

Feeling that the Sunday School and Christian Endeavor is the most vital of all Church auxiliaries in its life, growth, and future development, and that as a Church we have not given the time and attention to attracting, holding, and developing our young people that we should, we therefore recommend:

That this Conference manifest a greater interest in the work of the Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies.

That the history, government, and principles of the Christian Church be emphasized more in our schools and societies, and that our pastors take a more active part, informing themselves and instructing our Sunday School and Christian Endeavor leaders in methods, organization and worship.

That every Sunday School throughout the State take a monthly offering for missions, and a monthly offering for the Christian Orphanage at Elon College.

That every school and society be represented at its respective Convention and at the Elon Chautauqua next year with a live, wide-awake and progressive delegation.

That this Conference endorse the work of, and lend every aid possible to, the work of the Board of Religious Education, whose sole object is to promote the work and activities of our young people.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS.

REV. WILLIAM G. CLEMENTS.

We have to chronicle with a sense of profound loss the death of Rev. W. G. Clements, who died in February, 1924. In the passing of Bro. Clements, the Christian Church lost a prominent preacher, who was faithful to duty in all the walks of life. He returned from the Civil War with one arm gone, but the courageous spirit with which he faced the tasks of life more than compensated for his physical handicap. His services as a minister of the Christian Church were efficient and faithful to the end. In the course of his ministry he served as pastor of many of our most active Churches. His championship of the cause of righteousness and his zeal for the enlargement and increased activity of his Church were among the outstanding contributions of his ministerial career. For twelve years he served as Superintendent of Public Instruction of Wake County, N. C. He was a member of the board of trustees of Elon College from the organization of the institution until the time of his death. His going is a distinct loss in all the fields of service where he labored. "Know ye not that in the death of Bro. Clements a prince in Israel has fallen?" He is gone from earth, but not forgotten.

Revs. J. O. Atkinson, P. T. Klapp, and J. D. Wicker spoke very feelingly of the memory of the late-lamented Rev. W. G. Clements.
