Minutes of the Thirty-Ninth Biennial Session of The Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, Inc.

OAKLAND CHRISTIAN CHURCH CHUCKATUCK, VIRGINIA, MAY 2-4, 1950

The 39th Biennial Session of the Convention was called to order at 2:00 p. m. by Dr. John G. Truitt, President. The opening hymn was "The Church's One Foundation." The Secretary read the following resolution:

WHEREAS, The records published in the Annual indicate that for the years of 1934, 1942, 1944, 1946 and 1948, the session of the Convention were held under and in the name of The Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, and not in the name of The Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, Incorporated, the corporate name of the body according to its charter and amendment; and,

WHEREAS, It is expedient and mandatory that the Convention shall use its corporate name in the transaction of all official business, therefore, it is moved:

- 1. That there shall be unanimous consent for the President of this body to declare that The Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, Incorporated, is now assembled in regular session for the transaction of all business in keeping with the Constitution and by-laws and other provisions for its regular work.
- 2. That this session shall declare its will and wish to validate the sessions of the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches held in the above-named years, for all purposes and intent, as being the regular sessions of The Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, Incorporated.
- 3. That hereafter all session of said body, together with all official reports, records, communications or actions of officials, elected or employed, including the Convention *Manual*, shall be held, recorded or issued indicating the official corporate name of this Convention or the relation to the same."

Upon motion the resolution was adopted.

Dr. H. S. Hardcastle, host pastor, extended a most cordial welcome and presented an official Convention gavel which President Truitt accepted for the Convention.

Mrs. Jo W. Williams, of the Convention Office, was appointed assistant secretary for this session of the Convention.

To the roll call the following members responded:

Ministers—Eastern Virginia 18, Eastern North Carolina 6, Valley of Virginia 3, Western North Carolina 3, North Carolina and Virginia 11; total 41.

Lay Delegates—Eastern Virginia 17, Virginia Valley 3, Eastern North Carolina 15, Western North Carolina 4, North Carolina and Virginia 13; total 52.

Members of Boards and Committees (not counted above)—9.

The President declared a quorum present.

The following visitors were presented to the Convention: Rev. E. F. Raiford of the Friends Church; Dr. Truman B. Douglass, Executive Vice-President, Board of Home Missions, New York; Dr. Ross W. Sanderson, Director of Field Research, The Board of Home Missions, and Mrs. Sanderson, and Timothy Chang. Upon motion the Convention made Mr. Raiford, Dr. Douglass, Dr. Sanderson and Timothy Chang deliberative members of this Convention.

The Program Committee presented the printed program as the order of business for this session.

Voted to make the printed program the order of the Convention, subject to such changes as may be necessary.

The President appointed the following Committees:

Business—Will B. O'Neill, Chairman, W. J. Andes, H. G. Councill, Jr. Resolutions—J. F. Apple, Chairman, T. Fred Wright, Stanley Carne, Mrs. O. H. Paris. Credentials—I. H. Vickery, Chairman, Guy H. Veazey, R. E. Newton.

The Secretary presented a summary of the actions of the Executive Board during the biennium, as follows:

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD.

The following persons constituted the Executive Board of the Convention during the biennium:

1. Nominated by the Convention and Conferences and elected by the Convention at Liberty (Vance), 1948:

John G. Truitt, President; W. Millard Stevens, Vice-President; J. Everette Neese, Secretary; Eastern Virginia—Mills E. Godwin, Jr., H. S. Hardcastle (for John G. Truitt, resigned); Valley of Virginia—Robert A. Whitten, R. E. Newton; Eastern North Carolina—J. Frank Apple, S. H. Basnight; Western North Carolina—George T. Gunter, E. C. Brady; North Carolina and Virginia—K. D. Register, Zeb H. Lynch. Members-at-Large: Will B. O'Neill, Mrs. W. W. Sellers, W. E. Wisseman.

2. Nominated by the respective Boards, Committees and Institutions, and elected by the Executive Board:

F. C. Lester, Mission Board; D. R. Fonville, Board of Superannuation; Jesse H. Dollar, Board of Christian Education; W. E. Wisseman, Board of Publications; Mrs. O. H. Paris, Women; L. E. Smith, Elon College; (Charles D. Johnston, deceased, V. R. Holt) John G. Truitt, Orphanage; C. Baxter Twiddy, Pilgrim Fellowship; Stanley C. Harrell, Finance Committee; George D. Colclough, Laymen; Robert Lee House, Editor, The Christian Sun.

The Executive Board constituted the Executive and Office Personnel Committees of the Board as follows:

Executive—John G. Truitt, J. Everette Neese, Will B. O'Neill, Mills E. Godwin, Jr., Stanley C. Harrell, W. E. Wisseman, George D. Colclough.

Office Personnel—W. Millard Stevens, Stanley C. Harrell, W. E. Wisseman, George D. Colclough, John G. Truitt.

During the biennium the Executive Board of the Convention has had five meetings. The first meeting was held at Elon College, October 12-13, 1948, with sixteen members of the Board and one visitor present.

The Board approved and adopted the following actions of the Executive Committee in meetings held May 22 and September 16, 1948:

- 1. That John G. Truitt, George D. Colclough and William T. Scott constitute a committee to confer with three members of the Board of Trustees of Elon College to bring recommendations concerning the two million dollar campaign for the college;
- 2. That the Committee on Superintendent's Home be empowered to erect or purchase a home for the Convention Superintendent in accordance with the action of the 1948 session of the Convention and that the President and Secretary of the Convention be authorized and instructed to sign the necessary papers for a loan of \$9,000.00 from the Congregational Church Building Society, 287 Fourth Avenue, New York, to finance the project;
 - 3. That Miss Dorothy Scott be elected Assistant Treasurer;
- 4. That the resignation of Miss Elizabeth Chicoine be accepted, with regrets, and the Committee on Office Personnel be instructed to fill the vacancy created by Miss Chicoine's resignation;

- 5. The adoption of the budget of \$15,700.00 for Convention employed personnel, promotion and office expenses for the year July 1, 1948 June 30, 1949;
- 6. The appointment of George D. Colclough, John G. Truitt, W. Millard Stevens as a committee on the administration of the Ministerial Loan Fund;
- 7. That the Superintendent be instructed to secure bond for office personnel and Treasurer through the Board of Home Missions, New York (Note: Fidelity Bond—Aetna No. IF6634R—Blanket Position Bond \$100,000.00 indemnity each expires June 30, 1951);
- 8. The election of delegates to the General Council meeting at Oberlin, and the President and Superintendent authorized to fill any vacancies in the delegation;

The Board elected Drs. H. S. Hardcastle, Eastern Virginia Conference representative; J. H. Dollar, Board of Christian Education; F. C. Lester, Mission Board; as members of the Executive Board.

The Board gave consideration to the proposal of the election of a full time Secretary of Stewardship and Evangelism, and voted to continue this proposal for further consideration.

The President appointed Mills E. Godwin, Jr., H. S. Hardcastle and Will B. O'Neill as a special committee on investigation of the history of the Ministerial Loan Fund, and to bring recommendations in line with the 1948 Convention actions. Stevens, Colclough, Scott and Smith were designated to formulate recommendations for the awarding of proceeds from the Ministerial Scholarship Fund.

A committee of representatives from each Conference was appointed and charged with responsibility for the promotion of the Staley-Atkinson-Newman Foundation, solicitation for which closed October 31, 1948.

The Board approved the Two Million Dollar Campaign for Elon College as authorized by the Convention and as outlined by President Smith. It voted that the plan of procedure be: (1) the completion of the Staley-Atkinson-Newman Memorial Foundation; (2) the construction of a new gymnasium; (3) the construction of a dining room or dormitory.

The Board voted in the name of the Convention to establish the O'Kelly Memorial Foundation for the purpose of preserving and caring for the James O'Kelly Family Cemetery in Chatham County, North Carolina, and that the Trustees be empowered to take such legal action as necessary to have the Convention become custodian of the property on which the cemetery is located. The President appointed Dr. C. E. Newman as Secretary-Trustee of the Foundation for three years. Other Trustees and terms were appointed as follows: Stanley C. Harrell, 3 years; Miss Margaret Hall and S. H. Basnight, 2 years; Miss Lillie Fowler and Kenneth D. Register, 1 year; the terms to begin July 1, 1948.

The Board voted to elect Dr. C. E. Newman Historian, to work with Elon College in the development of a church history room at the college.

The President was asked to appoint a committee to study the matter of retirement as proposed by the 1948 Revisions Committee. The committee appointed was R. L. House, Mrs. O. H. Paris, Mills E. Godwin, Jr.

The Committee on Legal Counsel and Safeguarding our Churches was contniued, members being S. C. Harrell, George T. Gunter, S. E. Madren, Mills E. Godwin, Jr., C. C. Dollar, L. E. Smith and W. M. Stevens.

The President appointed Rev. R. A. Whitten as Chairman of the Committee on Evangelism, replacing Dr. F. C. Lester, resigned.

Dr. Jesse H. Dollar, Chairman, Committee on Superintendent's Home, reported major work on the home was completed and the Superintendent and family occupied it October 1, 1948. Members of the Board inspected the home and participated in an impressive Service of Dedication.

The second meeting was held April 19-20, 1949, at Elon College, with 21 members and three visitors present.

The Board approved the action of the Executive Committee as follows:

1. Authorizing the Mission Board to make a special appeal for Relief and Reconstruction, such funds to be included in the budget for the Mission Board adopted at the 1948 session.

- 2. Authorizing Superintendent Scott to offer a position to Miss Pattie Lee Coghill to serve on the staff of the Convention at a salary of \$3,000.00, travel expenses, a share in the payment of her annuity dues,
- 3. That the Personnel Committee with representatives from Boards and Institutions be authorized to meet with Miss Coghill explaining her duties and making other adjustments necessary to the fulfillment of her employment.
- 4. That the Personnel Committee be empowered to work out, without cost to the Convention, a plan for financing an automobile for Miss Coghill.

The Board adopted the report of the committee on the Ministerial Scholarship Fund and elected Dr. Jesse H. Dollar, Mrs. W. E. Wisseman and Kenneth D. Register as a committee to administer this fund. That committee's report will give the details to the Convention.

The Board received a report from the Superintendent's Home Committee and voted that the committee be urged to finish their campaign to raise sufficient funds to pay the deficit carried by the Convention Fund. This committee will make a detailed report to this Convention session.

Mr. Vitus R. Holt was recognized as the authorized representative from the Christian Orphanage replacing Mr. Charles D. Johnston, deceased, until a new Superintendent has been elected.

The Board voted to recommend to the Convention that it change its fiscal year to coincide with the calendar year.

Mr. Vitus R. Holt, acting Superintendent, reported for the Orphanage and at his request the Secretary of the Convention read correspondence from the Board of Trustees of the Orphanage as follows:

"At a recent meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Christian Orphanage the request from the Convention for \$600.00 annually to support the Southern Convention office was discussed at length, and by vote of the Board the officers were instructed to request the Executive Board of the Convention to withdraw this most unusual request for funds."

It was voted that the matter of the Christian Orphanage request for release from financial support of the administrative cost of the Convention be referred back to the Board of Trustees of the Orphanage for consideration at their next meeting and that President Truitt (Dr. S. C. Harrell replaced Dr. Truitt) and Superintendent Scott constitute a committee to meet with the Trustees, explaining the position of the Convention and to report back to the Executive Board at its next session.

The Board heard the report of the special committee appointed to investigate the history of the Ministerial Loan Fund and voted to adopt the report subject to approval of the Southern Convention in session. The full report of this committee will be given to the Convention by the Ministerial Loan Fund Committee. It was voted to turn over to Mr. Mills E. Godwin, Jr., the delinquent notes held by the Ministerial Loan Fund.

Regarding free tuition for ministerial students at Elon College the Board voted to "commend Elon College for the historic practice of granting free tuition scholarships to students preparing for the Christian ministry, and that the college continue this practice of giving full tuition grants to such ministerial students."

The Board adopted resolutions presented by the Board of Publications regarding *The Christian Sun*. These resolutions will be submitted by the Board of Publications in detail.

The Board adopted the operating budget for the fiscal year, July 1, 1949-June 30, 1950, totalling \$17,953.00.

It was voted that the financial records of the Mission Board, the Convention Office and the Board of Christian Education be audited as of December 31, 1949.

It was voted that the Secretary be instructed to issue notice and text of any proposed change in the Constitution and By-Laws of the Southern Convention.

Mrs. John G. Truitt was elected to the Mission Board to fill the unexpired term of Rev. Joe A. French, resigned.

Rev. W. Millard Stevens was elected to represent the Convention at the International Council of Congregational Christian Churches, Wellesley College, Wellesley, Massachusetts, June 17-24, 1949. Other representatives were President L. E.

Smith and Superintendent William T. Scott.

The third meeting was held at Henderson, North Carolina, October 11, 1949, with 19 members present.

The Board adopted the action of the Executive Committee and Personnel Committee employing Miss Coghill as Educational Secretary to begin October 1, 1949, at an annual salary of \$3,000.00, 8 per cent of her salary as annuity deposits, payment of annual premiums on \$1,000.00 life insurance, travel expenses of \$1,000.00 per year, and that Elon College be her official residence and office; that \$500.00 from the Convention Fund be advanced to Miss Coghill on her note without interest and that \$25.00 be withheld each month to repay the amount which is to be used towards the purchase of an automobile for her use as Educational Secretary.

It was voted that the mileage allowance for the Educational Secretary and Superintendent be 7 cents per mile as of October 1, 1949.

Upon report of the Treasurer and Bookkeeper the Board voted that the church by church file of receipts on apportionment be kept for the period of two years.

(Note: The Convention Office handles a remittance as follows:

1. A receipt is made in triplicate from the check and remittance slip or letter which accompanies the payment. One copy goes to the remitter; one copy goes in our church by church file; the third copy remains in the receipt book. The remittance slip or letter is filed in a church by church file.

2. The remittance is recorded in a premanent general receipts book which shows the name of the church, person sending the payment, the amount of the

remittance, and the distribution of that amount.

3. At the end of a Conference Year the total receipts from each church and the distribution of the gifts are printed in the Annual.)

The matter of contributing to the support of the Board of Pastoral Supply, Boston, to help defray their expense in service to our churches was referred to the Finance Committee for presentation to the Convention for action.

Mr. Mills F. Godwin, Jr., reported on his attempt to collect delinquent Ministerial Loan Fund accounts, stating that he had contacted those indebted to this fund and that he had answers from only four people. It was voted that the special committee consisting of Mr. Godwin, Will B. O'Neill, H. S. Hardcastle be instructed to collect notes now due on the basis set forth by the Convention session of 1948 and that this committee bring to the Convention report and recommendations concerning the disposition of the unpaid notes and the restoration of the Ministerial Loan Fund to its original amount.

Dr. W. E. Wisseman presented the following report for information on the Cora L. Anthony Trust Fund:

"In accordance with the terms of the Last Will and Testament of Mrs. Cora L. Anthony, Greensboro, North Carolina, deceased, a Trust has been set up known as the Cora L. Anthony Trust Fund. The income from this Trust is to be used: to pay the salaries of missionaries and to help worthy students preparing for the mission field." Dr. L. E. Smith, Mrs. O. H. Paris, and W. E. Wisseman have been named trustees by the Guilford County Superior Court. W. E. Wisseman has been named Treasurer. At this date there is available approximately \$3,000.00 for disbursement in accordance with the terms of the Will."

Dr. S. C. Harreli presented a summary of the conference held with the Board of Trustees of the Orphanage with regard to the item of \$600.00 annually requested of the Orphanage for the support of the work of the Convention, and it was voted that it was the sense of this Board that it is not within the power of the Executive Board to change the action adopted by the Convention relative to this item and that the Convention action will have to stand as is for the Orphanage to take such action as it sees fit.

The Executive Board elected a committee of five—Dr. W. E. Wisseman, Dr. S. C. Harrell, Mr. Mills E. Godwin, Jr., Mrs. W. W. Sellers, Dr. Will B. O'Neill—to take the matter of relationship between the Southern Convention and Orphanage under advisement and to bring to the Board at its next meeting some suggestions for action.

The resignation of Dr. Jesse H. Dollar as Chairman of the Superintendent's Home Committee was accepted with regrets and Mr. George D. Colclough was elected his successor.

Rev. R. A. Whitten reported for the Committee on Evangelism and Spiritual Life and urged the cooperation of our Convention with 36 other denominations in the Evangelistic Advance during 1950.

The Board voted to accept the invitation from the Oakland Church, Chuckatuck, Virginia, to hold the 1950 session of the Convention at that church May 2-4, 1950. The President appointed the following committees for the Convention session:

Nominations—Rev. W. J. Andes, Chairman, Rev. H. S. Hardcastle, Rev. R. E. Newton, Rev. Clyde L. Fields, Mr. A. H. McIver.

Program—Dr. John G. Truitt, Chairman, J. E. Neese, Mills E. Godwin, Jr., Mrs. O. H. Paris, the host pastor, with Miss Pattie Lee Coghill and Superintendent Scott, ex officiis.

Upon vote Rev. Wm. T. Scott was nominated as Superintendent for the 1950-52 biennium.

Dr. C. E. Newman, historian, reported on the development of the Church History Room in connection with the Elon College Library, requesting that someone be appointed by the Board in or near the college to work with the library in looking after this room; that money be solicited to purchase glass cases to hold valuable literature and priceless souvenirs of the early leaders of the Christian Church. The Board referred to the Nominating Committee the responsibility of nominating a custodian to work with the library in caring for the Church History Room.

It was brought to the attention of the Board that approximately five acres of land in Carroll County, Virginia, was through error deeded to the Southern Convention instead of the Mission Board. The Mission Board has opportunity to sell this property which is no longer needed for the development of our work there. The Board voted to authorize the President and Secretary of the Southern Convention to sign, seal, and deliver deed as presented by the Mission Board for sale of the property and that the money from this sale go to the Mission Board.

The Board voted commendation and appreciation to the Convention Office and field personnel for the great value of their work to the Convention, Conferences and Churches.

Consideration was given to the church law suits in the Western North Carolina Conference and possible need for funds outside the resources of that Conference to protect our interests. The matter was referred to the Executive Committee for action.

The fourth meeting was a special meeting held at Elon College, March 16, 1950, with 15 members and one visitor present.

The Board adopted the minutes and approved actions of the Executive Committee accepting the resignation of Miss Dorothy A. Scott, Assistant Treasurer, and the election of Mrs. Jo W. Williams as her successor; the recommendation for amendment of Article VIII, Section 4 of the Convention Constitution, referring to the duties of the Treasurer, which will be presented to the Convention for vote.

The report of George D. Colclough, Treasurer and of the Convention auditors, Owen and Hogan, Certified Public Accountants, Burlington, North Carolina Carolina, were presented to the Board for April 1, 1948-December 31, 1949, and referred to the Finance Committee for presentation to the Convention.

It was voted that the Executive Board recommend to the Convention "that By-Law III, paragraph 2, be amended so that the Convention fiscal year shall be the calendar year"; that the Executive Board approve and refer to the Convention for ratification, through the Finance Committee, "That appropriations for the next biennium from Boards and Institutions to the Convention and the Board of Publications begin July 1, 1950, and run through the fiscal year December 31, 1952."

In accordance with the action of the meeting of October 11, 1949, Dr. W. E. Wisseman, Chairman, reported for the special committee on "relations between the Orphanage and Convention." This report was adopted as follows:

"We, your special committee, elected on October 11, 1949, by the Executive Board of the Southern Convention to take the matter of relationship between the Southern Convention and the Orphanage under advisement and bring to this Board at its next meeting some suggestions for action on this matter, beg leave to submit the following report:

"We would call attention to Section 7 of the Charter of the Christian Orphanage adopted by the General Assembly of North Carolina on February 27, 1905, which reads as follows:

"'SECTION 7. That this corporation shall be under the supervision and control of the Southern Christian Convention, and said Southern Christian Convention shall have the power to elect the trustees for said corporation in such manner as it may prescribe, and fix their terms of office and the manner of filling any vacancy that may occur in said Board of Trustees, and the said Southern Christian Convention may increase the number of trustees at any time, not exceeding seven in all (amended to allow 15 Trustees); and the majority of the trustees shall be a quorum for the transaction for business.

"This provision of the Charter makes clear the authority of the Convention over the Orphanage.

"In view of the fact that the Orphanage Board of Trustees has requested that the Executive Board of the Convention revoke the action of \$600.00 a year for the 1948-50 Biennium from the Orphanage toward the support of the operating budget of the Convention and that the matter was referred to this committee, be it resolved that this Committee is of the opinion that the Executive Board of the Convention has no authority to change the action of the Convention session.

"It is further recommended that the funds contributed by the Congregational Christian Churches for the support of the Christian Orphanage continue to be sent through the Southern Convention office and remitted as provided by the Constitution (See Chapter VI, Article VIII, Section 4, Paragraph 3), and that the Orphanage pay the amount the Convention asks of it for administrative cost of the Convention."

Rev. W. Millard Stevens, Chairman of the 1948 Revision Committee, called attention to a printer's error in the Constitutional Amendments voted at Liberty Vance Church at the 1948 session of the Convention, Article VIII—Officers, page 36 of the Manual, Section 3, entitled 'Election and Term of Office':

"'At least three months before each biennial session, the Executive Board shall elect a nominating Committee. This Committee shall nominate all officers of the Convention, but nominations may also be made from the floor for any office. Officers and Board members shall be elected to serve for the biennium unless otherwise designated, or until their successors are elected and qualified.'

"In the second sentence of this paragraph, after Convention, the recommendations of the Revisions Committee adopted had the following clause:

"'Except for the Superintendent, who shall be nominated by the Executive Board, and the Editor of *The Christian Sun* who shall be nominated by the Board of Publications.' So that the entire section should read as follows:

"'At least three months before each biennial session, the Executive Board shall elect a Nominating Committee. This committee shall nominate all officers of the Convention except for the Superintendent, who shall be nominated by the Executive Board, and the Editor of *The Christian Sun*, who shall be nominated by the Board of Publications. Nominations may also be made from the floor for any office. Officers and Board members shall be elected to serve for the biennium unless otherwise designated, or until their successors are elected and qualified."

It was votd that this error be corrected in the official copy of the Constitution. The text of this correction appears in the report on revision at this session.

Attention was called to the fact that no official records of the North Carolina Christian Conference, Inc., chartered in 1919 and continuing annual meetings until 1925, have been recorded in the Convention Annual since 1926, and that the Conference undoubtedly had certain property and legal responsibilities in its custody. It was voted to request Mr. L. L. Vaughan, Secretary of the North Carolina Conference, Inc., to present to the Executive Board a copy of all transactions of the Executive Committee of the Conference since 1925 to date and that its Executive Committee submit in the future all official action annually to the Executive Board to be included in the Annual of the Southern Convention.

It was voted, in view of the recent decision of Judge Steinbrink, Brooklyn, relative to the Congregational Christian polity that the President appoint a committee to formulate a statement on the "Principles and Government" of the Southern Convention

and our relationship to the General Council of Congregational Christian Churches, to be forwarded to proper officials of the General Council of Congregational Christian Churches. President Truitt appointed S. C. Harrell, L. E. Smith and Superintendent Scott to serve on this committee.

Mr. S. H. Basnight, a trustee of the O'Kelly Cemetery Committee, presented a warranty deed to the plot of land in Chatham County, recorded in Book G, page 206 in the Register of Deeds office of Chatham County.

The Board authorized the Trustees, through Mr. Basnight, to initiate a campaign for \$500 to improve and preserve the property.

The Board approved the Annual Operating budget of \$18,000.00 for Convention employed personnel, administration, promotion and office from July 1, 1950, to December 31, 1951, subject to the approval of the Convention in session.

The Board voted that its Executive Committee be authorized to elect delegates to the meeting of the General Council in June, 1950, not provided for by the Nominating

Committee.

The Board authorized the President to appoint one person in each Conference to work with Dr. Ronald Bridges in soliciting funds for the court appeal of Judge Steinbrink's decision concerning the Congregational Christian Churches. President Truitt appointed Rev. R. A. Whitteen, W. B. Williams, Cyrus Shoffner, I. H. Vickery and W. E. Wisseman.

The fifth meeting of the Board was a regular session held at Elon College, April 18, 1950, with 14 members, one ex officio member and seven visitors present. The Board approved the minutes of the Special Session held March 16.

Prof. L. L. Vaughan, Secretary of the North Carolina Christian Conference, Incorporated, presented information regarding the action of the Executive Committee of that Conference since 1925 to date, stating that official copy would be filed with the Executive Board.

The Board referred the election of Trustees of the O'Kelly Memorial Foundation to the Nominating Committee.

Regarding terms of office for members of the Convention Boards the Executive Board adopted a resolution and recommend it to this Convention for action. The text of this resolution appears in the report on revision.

The President appointed the following Chairmen:

Social Action—Mack V. Welch, for M. W. Andes, resigned. Memoirs—H. G. Councill, Jr., Co-Chairman. Stewardship—James F. Darden for Joe A. French. Visual Aids—Henry E. Robinson.

The Board reviewed the minutes of the sessions held during the biennium and authorized the President, Secretary and Superintendent to prepare this summarization.

At each meeting of the Board held during the course of the biennium reports have been received in detail from the Superintendent, the Field Secretary, the Treasurer of the Convention Fund, the Convention Office and from all the officers of the Convention Copies of these reports are in the hands of the Secretary and may be examined by any member of the Convention upon request. Also detailed minutes of each session of the Executive Board are on record in the minute book of the Executive Board, which is a permanent record, in the hands of the Convention Secretary, and may be examined upon request by anyone desiring to examine such records.

The foregoing actions of the Board are a summary of the significant actions which the Board has taken. Other actions are included in the minutes mentioned above. At each session of the Board, the Board has also received reports from the various committees of the Convention and has counseled with said committees with reference to their work.

The Treasurer's report carries the expenditures for Convention employed personnel, promotion, administration and Convention office expenses.

To make the said actions of the Executive Board of the Convention the official action of the Southern Convention of Congregational and Christian Churches, Inc., with the exception of the resolution on tenure and terms of office of Board members, which will be presented for consideration and vote of the Convention in connection with revisions of the Constitution and By-Laws.

Rev. W. Millard Stevens, Vice-President, presented Dr. John G. Truitt, who gave the keynot address of the Convention, using as his theme, "A New Togetherness for a Needed Advance."

The Superintendent's report was presented by Dr. Wm. T. Scott, as follows:

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE SOUTHERN CONVENTION

A report of the success of the work of the Superintendent cannot be considered complete apart from an acknowledgement of the faithful work which has been done by all of you. Officers of the Convention, Boards, Conferences, Institutions, the Women, the Young People, Laymen, and the consecrated pastors and unselfish members of the 195 local churches deserve the praise, commendation and thanks of the Superintendent. I have tried to help you do your job of Christian discipleship.

I have tried to do the work a Superintendent is supposed to do as Executive officer, counsellor, "trouble-shooter," promoter, etc. I have tried to promote the general work of the denomination and particularly of the Southern Convention through its Boards, Conferences, Committees and local churches. With able assistance of hundreds of cooperative workers we believe that some progress has been made during the biennium, and may our Lord be praised!

From April 1, 1948 through March 31, 1950 I made 235 visits to churches, 79 such visits having to do with assisting churches to obtain pastoral leadership; held or participated in 404 groups meetings with churches, conferences, committees, boards, etc; had 486 interviews and conferences with individual pastors, had 1,233 interviews and conferences with individual lay people regarding the work of churches; preached 68 sermons; delivered 97 addresses; traveled 48,820 miles. Expenses paid by the Convention for this period were \$2,800.83.

In the work of the Superintendent numerous meetings are to be promoted, planned for and programs arranged; numerous addresses to be made and Board, Committee, and Conference meetings consume much time. One of the rewarding parts of the life of a Superintendent is the association with our able and consecrated ministry. The Superintendent is a representative of the Convention in national denominational and interdenominational meetings. It was my privilege, pleasure and profit to attend the International Congregational Council held at Wellesley last June, the Home Missions Congress of North America held at Columbus, Ohio, in January of this year, the Mid-Winter Meetings and Superintendent's Conferences of our denomination held each year, and numerous other denominational and interdenomination gatherings. A vast amount of office correspondence must have the personal attention of the Superintendent.

I wish to pay special tribute to the young women of our Convention Office who give themselves unselfishly and untiringly in keeping *The Christian Sun* subscription list, receipting the funds for Convention causes, keeping the records accurately and doing an almost endless round of office work,

Mrs. Scott and our family wish to express gratitude to the Convention for the lovely home erected and now occupied by our family as the Superintendent's Home. In thus providing for us you have added to our comfort and have made it possible, we hope, for us to render more efficient service.

Reports on much of the work of your Convention during the biennium will be embodied in the reports of the Committees, Boards, Institutions, and Auxiliaries, and they need not be repeated here. However, I desire to call to your attention certain matters for emphasis.

THE STATE OF OUR CHURCHES

There have been greatly improved facilities and comforts in our local churches, so far as buildings are concerned. For instance, in the Conference year 1948-49 116 of our 195 churches reported a total of \$264,483.00 spent for church building, repairs and paid on indebtedness. During the biennium 12 new parsonages were erected or purchased: Berea, Oakland, Christian Temple, Liberty Spring, Newport News, Sunbury, Sanford, Pleasant Ridge, Seagrove, Sophia and Flint Hill (R), Belew Creek and Salem Chapel, Burlington, Happy Home. (In the previous biennium there were 17 parsonages provided.) New church and/or education buildings or major alterations: Catawba Springs, Sanford, Mt. Carmel, Shallow Well, Wake Chapel, Bethlehem (Nans.), Oakland, Shiloh, Ashville, Danville, Durham, Elon College, New Lebanon.

Tryon's educational building and Asheboro's new edifice under construction at the last session of the Convention have been completed. Construction of buildings contemplated in the near future include Greensboro "First," Greensboro "Palm Street," Franklin, Rosemont, Norfolk "Second" (relocation), Windsor, and possibly others. Southern Pines suffered the loss of its educational building by fire and plans are being made for rebuilding.

On the average more adequate salaries are being paid to our ministers. We have a more adequately trained ministry. There are larger local church budgets. During the 1948-49 Conference Year our churches raised \$658,389.00 for local expenses as compared with \$550,368.00 in 1947 and \$456,790.00 in 1946.

The Women's work, Pilgrim Fellowship, and Laymen's activities are sources of encouragment. We are particularly gratified with the increased interest and organization of our Laymen, and we have given considerable time in assistance of this work. Elon College is experiencing one of its most successful years, with more than 800 students, and an excellent faculty. The College needs our prayers, our gifts, and the young men and women from our homes. Hard days will be faced by our college unless we give more generously in our support. The Christian Orphanage under the leadership of Dr. John G. Truitt, the new Superintendent, continues its fine record of Christian service which was so nobly led by our late beloved Charles D. Johnston.

On Convention apportionments in 1949 our churches paid \$82,188.00 on a total goal of \$85,041.00 as against \$72,875.00 in 1947-48. In addition to this amount the Women's Missionary Convention contributed \$13,508.00 to Home and Foreign Missions on their goal of \$15,000.00 and \$3,202.00 for Relief and Reconstruction, on a total of \$6,005,00 raised for this cause by the Convention in 1948-49.

Since the 1947 Annual was compiled 101 of our 195 churches have had changes of pastors. In most of these changes the Superintendent has been called for counsel by Pastoral Committees. We suffered the loss of several of our good pastors through death, retirement, illness and removal from the area. We are not producing enough ministerial recruits to fill our needs for replacements.

We welcome into the service of churches of the Convention since the last Convention Revs. Luther B. Grice, Johnson L. Griffin, William A. Grissom, Roy C. Helfenstein, E. J. Rohart, Henry E. Robinson, Charles Cecil Thomas, Robert T. Woodruff, Duane N. Vore; Pastors elect Melvin Dollar, Union (Sou.); James H. Lightbourne, Jr., Holland; A. Lanson Granger, Jr., Newport News. We lament the death of Dr. Frank H. Lewis, one of our able pastors, and the retirement because of illness of Rev. Ben Joe Earp, Rev. J. Frank Morgan, Rev. J. L. Neese. After an active and successful ministry of more than 50 years, Dr. I. W. Johnson becomes Pastor Emeritus of Berea, Oakland and Liberty Spring Churches.

We are moving toward a respectability, but will have to take care that we do not as a church lose our souls in our respectability. Let us guard lest we experience a contentment in our comforts the loss of our evangelistice passion. The Southern Convention is in better condition materially than ever before in our history to move forward in a courageous advance. Let us match our material prosperity with a new spirtiual awakening and dedication.

Our low evangelistic index is a real concern and ought to humble us! In 1949 our churches with 34,278 members to start with received but 1,600 new members during the whole year (767 on Confession of Faith). We lost 1,153 by death and removal, giving the Convention a net gain of only 447, making our total membership 34,725 at the beginning of the 1949-50 conference year.

On Confession of Faith during the past year 120 churches received but 767 members, 57 churches received none and 18 churches made no report. In total membership 90 churches reported gains over the previous year, 68 reported losses, 17 churches remained the same and 20 made no report. It takes a minium number to maintain a church adequately. The size of our churches raises some serious questions. The 1949 statistics show that we have 27 churches with memberships under 50; 48 with memberships between 50 and 99; 77 between 100 and 249; 8 between 500 and 999, and one with more than one thousand members.

The fact that our churches have been established for long periods of time make these figures serious. We are not growing! This brings us to the conclusion that our evangelistic passion is not glowing, and large numbers of our people have moved to new communities. This latter condition is reflected throughout the whole nation, because over 50 per cent of the American population has moved within the past ten years. While the population in North Carolina and Virginia has increased only about 7 per cent and 11 per cent respectively during that period, great numbers have moved their residences to new communities within the area. We organized no new church last year and have established no new church in growing areas of population during the past ten years, with the exception of Bay View in Eastern Virginia, Asheboro in Western North Carolina and Zion in North Carolina and Virginia, and Zion was the only organization really effected during that period. At the present time final plans are being effected for the launching of a new church in Burlington.

In Sunday School enrollment we need to increase our effectiveness if the Sunday School is to be a means of recruiting membership for our churches. Per 100 church members in 1948-49 our Sunday Schools enrolled 64.5.

We may take some comfort in our record as compared with 48.1 for the denomination as a whole, but might well be challenged by the Evangelical and Reformed Church record in the South of over 90. Likewise, we need to enlist and organize our youth more effectively. Per 100 church members in 1948-49 our churches reported that 15.3 enrolled in youth organization as against 14.8 for the denomination as a whole. Under the able leadership of Miss Pattie Lee Coghill, our new Educational Secretary, and our Board of Christian Education, Pilgrim Fellowship and the Sunday School Conventions we may expect improvement in this area of our church life.

Though our record in giving compares favorably with the denomination as a whole there is a lack of stewardship conviction training and commitment, and on this we need to put new emphasis. In the 1948-49 Conference Year we gave on apportionment and benevolent cause \$3.24 per member, and \$19.23 per member for local expenses. It is believed that we of the Southern Convention have neglected to appeal as strongly as we might have done to members of our churches and others that they remember the Convention, its Board and Institutions when they prepare their wills. It is the responsibility of the church to encourage this form of stewardship that our people may be led to give for the perpetual use of the church a portion of the worldly goods with which their Heavenly Father has entrusted them. We recommend that a form of bequest be prepared in pamphlet form, circulated among our constituency and run regularly in *The Christian Sun*.

A NEW TOGETHERNESS FOR A NEEDED ADVANCE.

We are now in the middle of the 20th century, in the 158th year of our existence as a Christian Church in the South, and in the 330th year of our American Congregational Christian heritage. We have been blessed materially and spiritually We believe we have come to the place where we need to commit ourselves to a general advance in the effectivenss of our work as Christians in the Convention.

I should like to suggest that for the next biennium (1950-52) that the Convention accept the challenge of the theme of this session, "A New Togetherness for a Needed Advance," and launch "The Mid-Century Advance" in every area of our

church life; this Advance to be a part of "Our Christian World Mission" of the denomination; that the Convention appoint a Commission to formulate a plan of action for this needed advance, and that this Commission be composed of representatives from the Mission Board, Board of Christian Education, Board of Trustees of Elon College, Board of Trustees of the Christian Orphanage, the Finance, Evangelism and Stewardship Committees.

I further suggest that in this Advance we use the services of Dr. Ross W. Sanderson, Director of the Department of Field Research of our national Board of Home Missions, placed at our disposal for the purpose of surveying our present situation, helping us to discover our strength and weakness, and determine lines of action which we may follow for strengthening the life and witness of our churches in the Convention.

The report of the Board of Publications will reveal the great need for increasing the resources of *The Christian Sun*. Though we have worked consistently to increase the number of subscribers, and some success has been achieved, the subscription list is far too small. A study of the subscription list will reveal that the churches whose members receive *The Christian Sun* are the churches which are giving more generously to the educational, benevolent and missionary causes. An informed constituency will result in a strong church. *The Christian Sun* is indispensible. Let us support it!

At the last session of this Convention we registered our approval of the proposed merger between the Congregational Christian and Evangelical and Reformed denominations. A court in Brooklyn, New York, has delayed the plans for completing the union, pending the outcome of an appeal to the higher courts. While this particular union met with the approval of this Convention, we earnestly hope that whatever the outcome may be of the unfortunate legal proceedings we may not lose the great zeal of the Christian Church, which was a Christian union movement, born out of a passion to restore the unity of the Church of Jesus Christ, a unity lost "through wordly pride, human doctrine, unapostolic measures, and the want of love to God and sympathy for men."

The Christian Church, uniting with the Methodist followers of James O'Kelly in Virginia and North Carolina in 1792, Abner Jones and Baptist associates in New England in 1801, and Barton W. Stone's Presbyterian followers in Kentucky in 1804, was one of the first distinctive American Christian movements. Like the new nation being born with the ideals of liberty, the passion of this Christian movement was centered in the restoration of the unity of the Church on the broad basis of Christian democracy and brotherhood.

Can it be that this ideal for Christian union, cherished and demonstrated by these Christians and Congregationalists, will be lost in the present tragic confusion over a basis of union, an overemphasis upon "our great tradition," or in resorting to a secular court which presumes to pass judgement for all time against the conscience and will of Christians to unite their forces for world conquest in Christ's name? We think not! This is not the first time Christian people have been confused. Nor is it the first time the body of Christ has been threatened by a secular world and by tradition-bound, jealous men! In such former confusion, pride, and judgements the Church of Jesus Christ has stood at the graves of her opponents. This movement of our Lord goes on with a steady march toward the consummate and ultimate purpose, to answer the prayer of the Lord of all the earth, "that they all may be one."

The Executive Board The Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches Elon College, North Carolina

Gentlemen:

We have prepared a statement of cash receipts and disbursements for the Southern Convention Office and George D. Colclough, Treasurer, for the period from April 1, 1948 to December 31, 1949. This report is a consolidation of our two previous audits for the periods ending March 31, 1949 and December 31, 1949.

In Exhibit A we show a summary of all receipts and disbursements for the twenty-one-month period. You will note that the total receipts of \$250,801.75 includes transfers of the balances of the Home and Foreign Mission accounts as well as the Convention Office balance. These transfers were made in process of consolidating the accounts.

Exhibit B shows the receipts and disbursements of the convention fund for the twenty-one-month period.

We note also that your operating budget for the Convention Office and personnel is still on a fiscal year of July 1 to June 30. We would recommend that this budget year be put on a calendar year with your operations. Thus, you would be able to obtain better comparative figures.

Upon motion the Treasurer's report was received and referred to the Finance Committee.

The report of the Educational Secretary was presented by Miss Pattie Lee Coghill, as follows:

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

This report of my first seven months as Educational Secretary summarizes meetings and other activities participated in.

I-Women's Work

- I. The Southern Convention Women's Board Meeting and frequent conferences with Mrs. Paris, the President, and the Department Superintendents.
- 2 The Annual Fall Meetings of the North Carolina and the Eastern Virginia Women's Conferences. (In July, while still with the Missions Council, I attended the Annual Meeting of the Valley of Virginia Women's Conference.)
- 3. The regular fall meeting of the North Carolina Women's Board and a call meeting of the Eastern Virginia Women at the Eastern Virginia Conference, with other conferences from time to time with the president, Mrs. W. T. Harrell.
- 4. District meetings with local presidents in North Carolina and Eastern Virginia as follows: Asheboro, Henderson-Wake-Durham, Greensboro, Burlington, Norfolk, Suffolk and Waverly.
- 5. This year the *Spring Rallies* were combined so that one meeting was held in each of the three Conferences and were in the form of *Family Life Institutes*. This was arranged in order to have the services of Dr. Paul Reynolds, National Family Life Secretary.
- 6. Book reviews on the current mission theme were given in the following places: Albemarle, Carolina (Burlington District chairmen, Berea and Hopewell societies attending), Franklin, (Holy Neck and Union attending), Hebron (Union, Virgilina attending), Bay View (Second and Little Creek Churches attending), Pfafftown (combined with Sunday morning church service), and Union Ridge, Book review meetings arranged and attended at Wake Chapel and Liberty, Vance, involving all of the women of those two Districts.
- 7. Helped to organize *new socities* at Hebron and Shallow Ford and assisted, by providing literature and program suggestions, in the organization of three other new socities.
- 8. The Women's Packet for 1950-51 is being prepared and will be ready for sale at the School of Missions in June. Meetings of the Convention Literature Committee as well as individual conferences with the State Chairman of Literature have been held.

II-Young People's Work

- 1. A Fall Planning Conference of the officiers and counselors of the Souther Convention Young People was held at Elon College, with call meetings of the officers and "conferences" with the president from time to time.
- 2. At least one Rally has been held in each of the five Conferences of the Convention, with a special meeting of the officers to plan the program in each case. In Eastern Virginia there have been two conference-wide meetings, the Young People's Missionary Society in the fall and the spring Pilgrim Fellowship Rally.
- 3. There have been about a dozen new young people's socities and I have assisted by attending the organization meetings of five of these and follow-up meetings of the program committees.
- 4. Student work. A student conference in North Carolnia was set up for early January, but had to be cancelled because of Saturday classes in too many colleges. We are determined to hold one next year! I met with the students at Woman's College, Greensboro. I have had frequent conferences with individuals in the Student Christian Association and Ministeral Association at Elon, and worked with Dr. Reynolds in arranging chapel speakers when special workers have been in the Convention in connection with our general work.
- 5. We report a most successful Young Adult Conference held on a week-end in March in the Winston-Salem Church, with Dr. Paul Reynolds as guest leader.

- 6. The young people have worked hard to secure \$600.00 for an Overseas Worker in Europe this summer, and are grateful to all who have helped in this project. Max Vestal, freshman and ministerial student at Elon College, and member of our Asheboro Church, was selected by the Convention Committee and has been accepted by the Congregational Christian Service Committee. Interest and enthusiam have grown so much that they now plan to send A. D. and Jean Cobb, of our Burlington Church, for a month in a work camp in our Puerto Rico Mission. They have also been officially appointed by the Service Committee.
- 7. Plans are well under way for Student Summer Service Work this year and seven workers have already been selected and schedules are being set up.

III-GENERAL CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

- 1. A meeting of the Convention Board of Christian Education was held at Elon College, and "conferences" with Dr. Dollar, the Chairman, and others on the Board held throughout the year.
- 2. College Day was observed by a large number of our churches on the first Sunday in February, with good use of the special program prepared for the occasion. Speakers and members of the Music Department at Elon were scheduled in all churches desiring them.
- 3. The Summer Conference Committee of the Board of Christian Education has met several times, and planning sessions with each of the deans and directors of the Summer Conferences and camps have been held. I have also attended the meetings arranged by the Chairman of the Committee in charge of the Elon School of Missions.
 - 4. A summer conference poster has been prepared and mailed to the churches.
- 5. A meeting of the Committee on Children's Work was held to select Vacation Church School text books and to plan training institutes this spring.
- 6. Leadership Training Schools have been held in the Norfolk and Suffolk Districts in the Eastern Virginia Conference and in Burlington for the sixteen churches in Alamance County. Plans are in the making at the present time for new schools in Sanford, North Carolina, and in the Virgilina, Virginia, area.
- 7. The latest series of meetings was held from April 16 through the 30th and were combined Christian Education and Vocation Church School Institutes with Miss Grace Storms of the Division of Christian Education as special guest. We had excellent volunteer teachers in Mrs. W. J. Andes, Miss Julia Woodson, Mrs. W. E. Wisseman, Mrs. Mark Andes and Miss Dorothy Foltz. The first of these institutes was combined with a retreat for Sunday School superintendents and teachers arranged by Mr. S. H. Pell, President of the Western North Carolina Sunday School Convention, and was held in the Asheboro Church. Others were held at Burlington, Reidsville, Liberty, Vance, and Wake Chapel and Sanford, in North Carolina; and at Rosemont, Suffolk and Waverly in Eastern Virginia. Altogether, sixty churches were represented at these institutes.

IV-ITINERARIES FOR MISSIONARIES

- 1. Rev. and Mrs. Joseph L. Moulton of Ahmednagar, India were delighted with their meeting in this area and when they left asked if they could return sometime and visit all the churches missed on this trip!
- 2. Miss Frances Thompson of the Philippine Islands said this was the nicest few days she had ever had on a "speaking tour."
- 3. Three meetings have been arranged for *Junichi Nakamura*, teacher at Kobe College, Japan, who is now a graduate at Duke University; also several meetings for *Timothy Chang*, and for *Dr. Ralph Shrader* to speak one time to the Eastern North Carolina Young People's Rally.

V-GENERAL MEETINGS

I have attended the following general meetings the annual Conference sessions in Eastern Virginia, Eastern North Carolina, Western North Carolina and Virginia, and the mid-year Conference in the Valley of Virginia; two meetings each of the Executive Board and the Mission Board of the Southern Conven-

tion, the Evangelism Conference, Christian Worker's Conference, and the state meeting of the Universalist Women of North Carolina. There have been Committee meetings galore including the following: The Evangelical and Reformed Church Summer Conference Committee and the meeting of their Executive Committee with our Congregational Christian Officers; special meetings with Supt. Stanley and the Director of Religious Education of the Negro Churches; a Conference in Chapel Hill for Displaced Persons, along with numerous ones held in connection with our regular work.

Most visits to *local churches* have been in connection with group meetings or book reviews, but I should like especially to mention the anniversary banquet of the women at Newport News, a Christmas party at the Reidsville church, a young adult banquet at Burlington and the Harvest Festival at Union Ridge.

VI-OFFICE WORK

Office work is our biggest problem. There is a constant flow of routine letters with request for special help about dozens of different subjects and special days; the checking in and out of Visual Aid materials; sale of literature and books; with the mimeographing of programs and letters promoting our various meetings. At this point I want to add my personal thanks to Melva Foster, student at Elon College, for her help in office work. She is as "good as they come," but the office work is beyond both of us!

I cannot close this report without adding my appreciation for the amazing amount of volunteer work done by our people in the Convention, and done in the finest of spirit, with genuine concern for our common tasks. I have thoroughly enjoyed these seven months and look forward to a full and rich summer in our camps and conferences, the Sunday School Conventions, and in working with the Student Summer workers as they do their assigned work throughout the five Conferences.

Dr. Stanley C. Harrell, Chairman of the Finance Committee, gave the first reading of the Finance Committee's report, which will receive consideration and vote of the Convention on Wednesday.

The report of the Historian was given by Dr. C. E. Newman. Upon motion Dr. Newman's report was received and made a part of the Convention records.

REPORT OF HISTORIAN

The 1900 session of the Southern Christian Convention was held at Franklin, Va. Four conferences were represented. The Twentieth Century Fund caused much discussion. The sum of \$1,520.00 was in hand for the Orphanage; \$2,756.00 for Foreign Missions. All conference contributions were increasing. The Christian Missionary Association had in hand \$1,712.00 and work was to begin in Newport News, Va. Elon College during the ten years of its service had graduated fifty-six and twenty-six young men had entered the ministry. The goal for the Twentieth Century Fund was placed at \$20,000,00. A Book Depository was established with Dr. J. O. Atkinson in charge. At the close of the 19th century the convention had been functioning for forty-three years. There had been times of disaster and discouragement, however, much had been accomplished. Here are some of the statistics for 1899: The amount raised for Home Missions \$1,616.71; for Foreign Missions \$748.16; for Home and Foreign Missions and pastors salaries \$18,204.69. The Orphanage was not established. Elon College was in its tenth year. The cost of buildings for the College was \$50,675.00. Other assets \$23,577.00; total assets \$74,250.00. Our membership was at this time for the church 10,126 and for our Sunday Schools 6,000. The value of our church property was \$200,000.00.

From 1899 to 1950 Our progress is gratifying. Here are the statistics for the year 1949; total membership, 34,725; number of parsonages, 71; churches, 195; pastoral units, 97; value of church property, \$4,301,112.00; add to this the Elon College plant, \$2,000,000.00; the Orphanage, \$225,000.00, and we have a total of \$6,526,152.00. Pastor's salaries during this year totaled \$197.066.00; a gain over 1948 of \$17,000.00. The average pastor's salary for full time service was \$2,500.00; local finances in five conferences, \$658,389.00. Missions, Convention enterprises and miscellaneous benevolences, \$152,764.00, making a total of \$811,153.00. One hundred and sixteen of the churches spent for improvements in 1948-49, \$264,483.00. Our Sunday School membership totaled 22,330. In 1949 the women raised \$13,580.00 for Home and Foreign Missions and for relief and reconstruction \$3,202.00, making a total of \$16,710.00.

The Executive Board of the Convention, is session at Elon College on October 12, 1948, made history for the entire church in making provisions for the preservation and the perpetual upkeep of the family cemetery in which James O'Kelly is buried in Chatham County, N. C.

During the past biennium some interest has been shown in the improvement of the Church History room in the Library Building at Elon College. The late Major MacClenny donated some very valuable historical papers. Among other things given, there are a collection of books, papers and annuals by Mrs. Ivy Andes Frank, collected over a number of years by her late husband, B. F. Frank.

The Laymen's Fellowship launched by our laymen at the 1948 convention is growing in interest and numbers. Six hundred laymen attended their rally held at Elon College on Sunday, January 29, 1950.

The Christian Worker's Conference held at Elon the last of January and largely attended is another evidence that there are many in our church willing to have a part in the carrying on of the work of Christ's Kingdom through the agency of the church.

Upon motion the Business Committee was instructed to find a time for consideration and adoption of this report on Wednesday.

The afternoon session adjourned at 5:30 with the benediction by Dr. N. G. Newman.

TUESDAY—EVENING SESSION

A special program of music was presented by members of the Elon College Singers.

In the absence of Dr. F. C. Lester, Chairman, the Mission Board report was presented by Dr. Will B. O'Neill, Vice-Chairman, as follows:

MISSION BOARD REPORT

A generation ago men of vision like John R. Mott and Robert E. Speer set out on a crusade to "Evangelize the World in this Generation." It is easy to say that they did not succeed; but they made it necessary to translate the Bible into more than a thousand languages and dialects and established churches in every part of the world.

We are among those who walk the Emmaus Road, doing little ourselves except wishing that they had succeeded in bringing the Kingdom of Christ to earth. "We had hoped" that Japanese would worship our Christ, that China would become a nation of Christian homes, that India's hungry would find food for body and soul, that the Great Light would shine in the "dark continent," and that the United States would lead the world in Christian ideals. But when this did not happen just as we had hoped, we let our faith fade, decided to be "practical," made more gadgets for our comfort and lived in the lap of luxury. But we are not happy about the situation for always we have a disturbed heart.

The one hope for our distressed world is for Christian ideals to become effective in individual, community, national and international life. This we know; but our

works seldom tally with this knowledge.

Let us take the calendar year 1949 as an example. Our churches, Sunday schools and women's organizations contributed to the regular missionary program of the Church \$23,452.54 for Home Missions and \$20,084.88 for Foreign Missions (includes Shaowu gifts). By adding several "specials" including \$4,922.25 for foreign missions from the Reidsville Church, the totals amount to \$24,205.27 for Home Missions and \$28,910.70 for Foreign Missions. If we divide this by the number of our church members, we find that on the average each gave seventy cents a year, or six cents a month to Home Missions, and eighty-three cents a year, or seven cents a month to Foreign Missions.

We talk about building new churches in these United States and especially in North Carolina and Virginia, and we talk about making the world Christian rather than Communist. But it is hardly reasonable to believe that either of these things will happen so long as our contributions are so meager.

Those interested in the detailed financial statement of the activities of the Mission Board can find the figures in the report of the treasurer, who is also the treasurer of the Southern Convention. Your board has been trying to get shifted to the calendar year for its fiscal year and henceforth reports will be made on that basis.

In setting up a budget for 1950 it appeared to be necessary to make contributions to our work at Asheboro, Bay View, Belew Creek-Salem Chapel, Carroll County, Chapel Hill, Elon Community, Franklinton, First, Lynchburg, Pleasant Ridge (WNC), Providense Chapel (WNC), Richmond, Sanford, Seagrove, Union (Southampton), four Valley of Virginia pastorates, Windsor, Winston-Salem, and Zion, amounting to a total of \$18,243. For the Convention Office, The Christian Sun, and administrative expenses the budget allows approximatey \$3,000. To the Home Boards of the denomination is allocated \$2,500. When added together these items amount to \$23,693. We want to start two new churches in the Burlington area. To this end there is \$8,000 in the budget. Where will this money come from? You can see that we will need to receive in 1950 more than the \$23,452.54 received in 1949 if this is to become a reality.

The situation in Shaowu, China, in which we are so vitally interested, is difficult to appraise. We do know that the Jacksons, the Riggs, and Miss Burr are still at work in China. We must not fail them in this critical hour.

In every one of the foreign mission fields of the American Board the call is for more missionaries, more Bibles and other materials, more support for national workers. This is the Christian opportunity for "saving the world." And yet giving on the average of 83 cents a year can not possibly do it. How fine it would be if we each gave to foreign missions an average of \$8.43 as the members of our Reidsville Church did in 1949. What a difference it would make in the Christianizing of the world!

Your Mission Board is anxious to lead you in service to the churches and people of the United States and in establishing Christianity throughout the world. When a generation arises in America that will contribute to the missionary program voluntarily as much as this generation now contributes through taxation to a war program, that generation will witness the establishment of world-wide Christianity, human brotherhood, and the overthrow of atheism in whatever form it may be found. Your Mission Board would like for that generation to be ours!

From September 1, 1948 to December 31, 1949. The Mission Board sent \$29,-134.45 to the American Board for Foreign Missions and sent \$2,096.34 to the Board of Home Missions, New York, for National Home Missions.

The members of the Mission Board have been faithful in the discharge of their responsibilities and deserve the thanks of this Convention.

I desire to express the appreciation of the Mission Board to the devoted women of our Convention. They have not only given generously to the cause of Missions, but they have done a splendid job in missionary education.

The Mission Board has a big job assigned to it in the face of the great opportunity offered us in the Convention for the establishing new churches in communities where our witness is needed, in helping part time churches to have the full time services of pastors, in providing assistance for the erection of adequate buildings and in providing funds and missionaries to carry the saving knowledge of Jesus Christ to a world which is divided, torn, afraid and sin-sick. Let us pray, give and serve through our Mission Board that we may prove our worth as disciples of Jesus Christ.

Pending the adoption of the report, greetings were brought by Timothy Chang, Shaowu, China, ministerial student at Duke Divinity School, a letter was read from Rev. and Mrs. Richard L. Jackson and the following telegram was read from Dr. F. C. Lester:

Winter Park, Florida. Greetings: World conditions demand Christian forward thrust. Many churches and missionaries needed. Challenge Convention raise half million mission dollars by 1953. Let Christ and Communists know we care. Average fifteen dollars per church member by 1953 not impossible. Suggest continue proposed apportionments and balance specials. King's business demands work now.

The Mission Board report was adopted.

The President instructed the Secretary to send official greetings of the Convention to Dr. Lester and wish for him a speedy recovery of his health.

The report of the Woman's Convention was presented by Mrs. O. H. Paris:

REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY CONVENTION

As we bring you a resume of the work accomplished by the Woman's Convention during the 1947-49 biennium, we do so with a humble spirit and yet with great joy in our hearts.

If we turn back the pages of history and look over the records of the Woman's Convention since its organization in 1912—thirty-eight years ago—it is amazing how far we have come. Ideals and goals which then were vague dreams have become a living reality. The Woman's work has grown in every avenue through which it ministers, with varied gifts and traditions, the ever enlarging fellowship has found and met new opportunities and greater challenges.

During the biennium all rallies and conferences have been held with a definite increase in attendance and interest. The Annual School of Missions scheduled for July, 1948, had to be cancelled due to an outbreak of polio in our area.

The Nineteenth Biennium Session of the Woman's Convention and the Fourth Annual School of Missions was held in joint session at Elon College, June 13-15, 1949. The sessions were full of inspiration and challenge. The keynote speaker was the Moderator of the General Council, Miss Helen Kenyon, other speakers and leaders being of the same high calibre.

The Treasurer's report showed a new high in giving. It revealed that the Women of The Southern Convention had contributed \$35,440.39 to the church's program and missionary enterprise during the two years. A gain of \$1,865.80 over the previous biennium.

During the biennium many Friendly Service gifts have been sent to Franklinton, Ryder Memorial Hospital in Puerto Rico, Fort Berthold Indian Mission, Japan, The Christian Orphanage and clothing for overseas relief.

The Thank Offering, we call our "second mile gift" because it is over and above the local society's apportionment giving. The 1947 Thank Offering was designated to help build the Southern Convention Superintendent's home. In 1948 it was given to Relief and Reconstruction.

The Life Membership and Memorial fund, also over and above the regular giving, for the past three years has been used for Timothy Chang's seminary education at Duke Divinity School. Here the Women are having the joy of literally seeing their dollars at work—seeing the work of their hands established in the fine personality and manhood of Timothy Chang. It has been one of the most satisfying experiences we have even known.

The Woman's Convention has also given financial aid to our Young People's Summer Camps, to the Youth's Overseas Work Camp project.

A large number of our local societies have joined each year with the women of other denominations in observance of World Day of Prayer, World Community Day and May Fellowship Day—three special days when we feel a "oneness" with the wider fellowship of Christian Women at home and around the world.

In closing this report I speak for the women of our entire fellowship when I pledge you our support in a "new togetherness" for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom in all the areas of human life.

Mrs. O. H. Paris, President, Woman's Convention.

The report was received and made a part of the Convention records.

Dr. Truman B. Douglass, Executive Vice-President, Board of Home Missions, New York, addressed the Convention on the subject, "Signs of Rebirth in Protestantism."

Dr. W. B. O'Neill, Chairman of the Business Committee, moved that the Wednesday morning schedule be arranged so that the report of Pilgrim Fellowship come at 9:15, the Board of Christian Education at 9:20, the consideration of the report of the Board of Publications and *The Christian Sun* at 9:45, and report of Elon College at 10:15. This was voted.

Upon motion the Convention adjourned until Wednesday morning at 9:00 a.m. The benediction was given by Dr. Stanley C. Harrell.

WEDNESDAY—MORNING SESSION

The Wednesday morning session was called to order at 9:00 a. m. by Dr. John G. Truitt, President. After the singing of a hymn, Rev. S. E. Madren conducted the worship service.

The report of Pilgrim Fellowship was presented, as follows:

REPORT FROM THE SOUTHERN CONVENTION PILGRIM FELLOWSHIP.

At this moment the young people of the Convention are strongly led by fine sets of officers in the five conferences. There is a reason for confidence in view of the leadership which can be forwarded. All phases of tomorrow's church will be affected by the quality of training given to youth.

As a means to further unity, officers and young people and adult counsellors of the Eastern Virginia Pilgrim Fellowship and the Eastern Virginia Missionary Society have been conferring on the possibilities of forming one youth organization in that conference. A joint meeting of these two groups will be held this summer for the purpose of taking final action.

We know of new youth groups which have been organized in local churches in the past two years. Some groups have undertaken an outstanding part in their own church. The story of individual and group effort among young people would give courage for the future. Here is the backbone of whatever we do collectively.

Student Summer Service has brought together many young people who were interested in a worthwhile summer of Christian service. They have assisted in summer camps and directed vacation Bible schools.

Summer conferences and camps continue to inspire and influence youth of the Convention.

The Southern Convention was represented at the Sixth National Council of Pilgrim Fellowship by five young people and one counsellor. At this meeting in Defiance, Melva Foster was elected a Member-at-Large.

Baxter Twiddy volunteered for overseas work with the American Friends Service Committee last summer. He was a member of a work camp in Germany.

Melva Foster was largely responsible for gathering materials used in the Youth Packet and also for compiling the Plan Book.

Officers of the Southern Convention Youth Council elected for the biennium are: C. Baxter Twiddy, president; Richard Smith, vice-president; Helen Jackson, secretary; John Truitt, Jr., treasurer; Melva Foster, Missionary Action Chairman; Lois Long, Social Action Chairman; Evelyne Moore Graham, International Action Chairman; Fleta Moffitt, Personal Action Chairman; Dorothy Scott, Junior High Chairman and Counsellors: Mrs. W. B. Williams, Rev. W. J. Andes, Rev. James Allan and Rev. Fred Eutsler and Ann Truitt, editor of the Youth Outreach.

In recent months much attention has been given to sending a person to an European work camp. We believe that we may also send two others to Puerto Rico work camp. Final selection of candidates rests with the National Work Camp office. A fund-raising campaign has been successful.

C. BAXTER TWIDDY, President, Youth Council.

Voted that the report be received and admitted to record.

The report of the Board of Christian Education was presented by Dr. Jesse H. Dollar, Chairman, as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

The responsibilities assigned to the Board of Christian Education by the Convention have been faced with faith, and the results obtained have been encouraging.

The Plan of setting up the program of the board on the basis of its specific fields of interest, assigning responsibilities to special groups has been carried forward during the biennium with greater success than in previous years.

- 1. Children's Division—Mrs. W. J. Andes has served as chairman of this group and has led this section in a very helpful manner. A great many services have been offered the churches through their work.
- 2. Young People's Division—The Rev. Kenneth D. Register has served as chairman of this Division. Time and emphasis have been given to the work of our young people, especially our summer programs of camps and conferences.

Not having the services of a Field Worker multiplied the work of those responsible for the setting up of Daily Vacation Bible Schools, securing Student Summer Service personnel and lining up the schedules for the workers. The eight Student Summer Service workers spent almost all their time in rural church schools, where without their help the schools could not have been held.

- 3. Adult Division—This is the only area in which no promotional work was done. About the time we were ready to begin the work, the Chairman of the division moved away and we were not able to get the work properly organized around another individual.
- 4. Dvision of Higher Education—Mrs. W. E. Wisseman served as chairman of this special division, and much helpful work was done. Articles were carried in *The Christian Sun* making suggestions to the churches and encouraging them to promote the cause of Elon College in our churches.
- 5. Leadership Training—The Rev. Robert Lee House served as chairman of this division, and while the areas of endeavor were not quite so clear as in the other divisions, some constructive work was done, and many articles appeared in *The Christian Sun* bearing on the subject of trained workers in and for our churches and Sunday Schools.

We heartily commend Miss Coghill for the vigorous program she has developed so far and the enthusiasm and cooperation she is able to obtain for the work she is doing. We call upon our pastors, Sunday School superintenednts and Woman's Missionary Societies to continue their cooperation.

We commend the churches and individuals who have made possible the pledging of the entire \$100,000 to the Staley-Atkinson-Newman Memorial Foundation. Approximately \$90,000 has been paid to date. We wish to commend the plan recommended to this session of the convention by the Finance Committee, setting a goal of \$1.00 per member for the constituency, which, coupled with the conference apportionments from the churches, would afford a sustaining fund of \$50,000 annually for Elon College.

We would refer the Board of Christian Education and the Woman's Convention to recommendations 1 and 2, of our report to the last convention, since the subject of those recommendations will greatly aid the selection and training of young women for specialized work in our churches and on the mission fields. Those recommendations appear on page 3 of the Annual for 1948.

The report of the Ministerial Scholarship Fund was given by Dr. Jesse H. Dollar, Chairman, as follows:

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND.

The Southern Convention in Session at Liberty, Vance, Church, 1948 (Item 10, Report of the Committee on Finance), voted:

"That the awarding of scholarships to college and seminary students be the responsibility of the Board of Christian Education and that such scholarships be granted only to ministerial students and students who are preparing for other types of full time Christian service who are properly certified and recommended by the Conferences of which they are members; and the Board of Christian Education make report annually either to the Executive Board of the Convention or to the Convention itself relative to the status of the Scholarship Fund and the scholastic achievements of the holders of said scholarships."

The Executive Board at its meeting in April, 1949, adopted the following policy and recommendations with regard to the administration of the Ministerial Scholarhsip Fund:

I. Those who receive scholarships shall execute a negotiable note, carrying satisfactory collateral endorsement, to the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum from date of execution, subject also to the following conditions:

- (1) Purpose to pursue his educational preparation at least to the equivalent of a four-year standard college course. Failure to meet this requirement will render previously granted aid due and payable in equal installments over the same number of years such aid has been granted.
- (2) That the grantee continue in full-time Christian service in the Congregational Christian denomination (or its successor).
- (3) Provided further that such an individual continues in full-time Christian service in the Congregational Christian denomination (or its successor), for a period of five consecutive years after graduation from college or seminary, the notes in the above requirements shall be cancelled together with all interest due.
- II. Scholarships shall be granted under the following conditions:
- (1) The applicant shall be and remain a member of some local Congregational Christian Church (or its successor) and shall be properly certified and recommended for scholarship aid by the Conference of which his church is a member.
- (2) Applicant must be enrolled in a recognized college or seminary approved by the Scholarship Committee.
- (3) Applicant shall be making satisfactory scholastic progress, which would mean the passing of at least 4/5 of his courses; but having an average grade of not less than "C" on all courses would have a distinct bearing with the Committee on grants.
- (4) Grants will be made only to those individuals who are unable in person or through parents or guardians to pay the necessary expense of the foregoing requirements.
- III. We recommend that the Southern Convention appoint a Committee of three (3) from the Board of Christian Education to be designated as "The Committee on Scholarships," and that such a Committee be empowered to make loans or grants, and be responsible for proper investigations of applicants, be charged with the responsibility of seeing that the above conditions are current in the case of each grantee, and charged further with the collection of all amounts due from time to time, and report fully to the Board of Christian Education at its regular meetings.
 - (1) That the Board of Christian Education be asked to draw up a suitable blank for these transactions.

It will be noted that the above recommendations provided for Scholarships on a signed negotiable note basis. In accordance with its interpretation of the Scholarship Fund the Executive Board on October 11, 1949, passed the following vote:

"It is the sense of this Board that the Committee on Ministerial Scholarships is empowered to make grants for Work Scholarships and to prepare blanks for making such applications, the work to be done under the guidance of the Convention Superintendent; loans and other grants to be secured by notes as outlined at the April, 1949, meeting of this Board.

"It is recommended that applications be filed with the Superintendent and the Chairman of the Scholarship Fund (Board of Christian Education); also a certification from the Pastor that work has been done which would entitle a student to a Work Scholarship Grant."

Blanks have been prepared as authorized and the Board of Christian Education has designated its Chairman and two other members to constitute the Committee on Ministerial Scholarship Fund.

It should be stated that the Eastern Virginia Conference does not participate in this Fund, but retains its own Scholarship Fund to "be placed at the disposal of the Committee on Ministerial Education to be administered at its discretion." (1946 Minutes, Eastern Virginia Conference.)

We submit the financial statement from the Treasurer of the Convention.

The Minutes of the Tuesday session were read and approved.

On motion it was voted that Supt. Scott be authorized, as soon as possible, to have the Convention Charter amended to comply with the proper wording as voted by the Convention.

Voted that the Secretary send greetings to the following ministers who are absent from this Convention because of illness: Revs. B. J. Earp, J. F. Morgan, J. L. Neese, D. P. Barrett, D. R. Moffitt.

The report of the Editor of The Christian Sun was presented by Rev. R. L. House.

The report of the Managing Editor, Mr. John T. Kernodle, was presented, as follows:

REPORT OF MANAGING EDITOR

In the report submitted by the managing editor last year was the significant statement: "Up to the present time, this biennium, the paper has had no deficit." Realizing that such a condition could not continue in the face of rapidly rising costs, we recommended to the Board of Publications that they in turn recommend to the Convention an increase in subscription rates which, though less than those being made by many similar publications, would be likely to avoid a deficit during the ensuing biennium. The rate of \$5.00 for two years would also have reduced the work required in the Convention Office leaving that much additional time for other activities.

The Board, however, refused to recommend the increase, and instead, recommended that the price remain at \$2.00 per year. As the minutes will show, however, their recommendation was deleted from their report, and the report then adopted. Someone asked for a vote showing whether or not an increase would be favorably received. This vote showed a substantial majority in its favor. It was later rescinded by a majority vote of those present on Thursday, but by a much smaller vote than that by which it was carried. However, in the adoption of the writer's report the Board was given the power to regulate rates in the future. Twice your managing editor conceived it his duty to again recommend an increase, but as you know no such action was taken, as the Board was reluctant to assume the authority. Thus, in spite of the excellent job done by the subscription department during the biennium, there is at present a deficit as shown in the report of the Board.

Your managing editor has purposely avoided making any recommendations at this time. However, he and Superintendent Scott, with the approval of the chairman of the Board, Dr. Wisseman, have compiled some statistics which we believe will be informative. If *The Sun* is to serve its purpose in disseminating information to our constituency, it seems to us that the Convention should adopt a definite program and provide adequate means for carrying it out.

On motion it was voted to amend Section 5 of the report of the Board of Publications to read "that the subscription price of The Christian Sun be \$3.00 per year or two years for \$5.00, effective July 1, 1950.

It will be seen from this financial statement that we have to face an operating deficit constantly. The Convention Office carries the expense of postage and keeping the list of subscribers or our deficit would be considerably larger. The anticipated income from subscriptions for the biennium was \$9,000. The actual income from April 1, 1948 to April 15, 1950 was \$8,611.12. This and increase in printing cost account for the deficit.

MABEL J. RACHEL, Bookkeeper.

There were 2,217 subscribers paid up to April 1, 1950. We send free 115 copies of *The Sun* as exchanges and to other persons. Subscriptions are carried for only one month past due date. From September 1948 to date between 650 and 700 subscribers failed to renew their subscriptions and therefore had to be cancelled. The Convention Office makes a zealous effort to get all subscribers to renew their subscriptions. One month prior to expiration the first notice is sent. Those not renewing by the date the subscription is due receives a second notice. On the 20th of that month a third notice is sent to those not renewing and the fourth notice is sent at the end of one month from due date saying the subscription is being cancelled and appealing for renewal. The failure of many subscribers to renew is doubtless the result of special campaigns which are not followed up in local churches one year later. We have in many of our churches *Christian Sun* agents who are doing an excellent job in securing new and renewal subscriptions. To these agents we wish to express our gratitude, and we appeal to all churches to designate agents that *The Christian Sun* may be kept before our people.

We have approximately 10,000 families in the Convention. We have at the present on our mailing list less than 2,000 persons in the Convention. We need *The Sun* for promotion of our church life and work. The loss of *The Sun* would be tragic to our fellowship, but it is certain we cannot continue to publish it without funds to pay the publisher. If we would really get behind *The Sun* in our churches we could lift the number of subscriptions to the number adequate to pay for it. We appeal to you for renewed and increased support.

We submit the following resolutions adopted by the Executive Board and ask you to reaffirm them:

1. That we reaffirm our appreciation of the long and useful service of *The Christian Sun* among our church constituency; that we express our confidence in the indis-

pensible service it can and will render in the coming years for the promotion of the enterprises of our church and for the welfare of our constituency; that we believe confidently in the ability and willingness of our church constituency to support The Christian Sun adequately.

- 2. That we commend the Editor, Managing Editor, and others responsible for the publication of The Christian Sun for their untiring efforts in the discharge of their duties.
- 3. That the Board of Publications with the Editor, Managing Editor and Convention Office study and put into effect at their discretion the constructive suggestions contained in the report of the special committee on ways and means of improving the quality of The Christian Sun.
 - 4. That The Christian Sun be continued as a 16-page weekly publication.
- 5. That the subscription price be \$3.00 per year, \$5.00 for two years; that present discount to organizations of 10 per cent for renewals and 20 per cent for new subscriptions be continued.
- 6. That the Board of Publications and a special committee appointed by the Executive Board be charged with the responsibility of obtaining 100 Christian Sun sustaining memberships of \$10.00 per year to help give perpetuity to The Christian Sun.
- 7. That the subscription goal for The Christian Sun be set at 5,000 and the Convention Office, with the cooperation of the Convention, Conference officials, pastors, churches, laymen's groups, and women's societies promote a subscription campaign in keeping with the resolution from the Valley Central Conference: "That a list of at least 2,500 laymen of our churches, who do not subscribe to The Christian Sun be secured and that they be appealed to by letter or in person to subscribe to The Christian Sun. That this Conference go on record as approving this plan and pledge its full cooperation."
- 8. That the Board of Publications with the Editor, Managing Editor, and the Convention Superintendent, be a committee to seek to supplement the income of The Christian Sun by obtaining suitable paid advertisements.

The following report of Elon College was given by Dr. L. E. Smith, President:

ELON COLLEGE REPORT TO THE SOUTHERN CONVENTION. (ABBREVIATED.)

Elon College is happy to report that your college is in excellent condition. What the future holds for the small church college, no one could hazard even a guess. We all realize, however, that problems, difficult of solution, are confronting our church colleges. Elon College is no exception.

During the biennium, student enrollment has reached the high figure of 865. Enrollment for the current year is 851. Its faculty is adequate and excellent from the standpoint of academic training and classroom experience. During this period, the College has been able to meet its current budget promptly. Valuable additions have been made to its equipment. A new power house cost \$135,000. Ten new faculty homes cost \$110,000. A new gymnasium cost \$245,000. All have been paid for, with the exception of the gymnasium. There is a balance of \$115,000 due on this project. The Staley-Atkinson-Newman Memorial Fund of \$100,000 has failed to reach its goal by a little more than \$10,000.

The College counts it a privilege to cooperate with the Convention and abide by its decisions. It is contributing annually to The Christian Sun, to the Convention Office, and to the training of ministerial students and full-time Christian workers—a total of \$3,650.

The Convention apportions to the churches through the conference a total of \$15,000 annually. Of this amount, \$12,600 was paid during the current year. This contribution to the college by the churches, through the apportionment plan, is of great assistance to the college in meeting its current demands.

Dr. Smith commented on the report and then presented Dr. W. M. Brown, who spoke concerning the work of the Elon College Foundation. Dr. Smith also presented the Trustees of the College present at the session.

Voted to amend Section 4 of the Finance Committee's report by striking out the last sentence.

Voted to adopt Section 4 of the Finance Committee's report relative to raising \$1.00 per member annually for sustaining fund for Elon College.

Voted to receive and submit to record the report of Elon College.

Dr. S. C. Harrell presented the report of the Committee on the Ministry, as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE MINISTRY.

"For even the Son of man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give his life a ransom for many" (Mark 10:45). These are the words of Jesus himself. Matthew records them in almost identical form, except that he makes them the conclusion of a long sentence in which Jesus sets forth the fact that service is the measure of all true greatness.

In the light of these words of our Saviour, let us face the fact that the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches is not raising up enough ministers to provide its churches with pastors. Along with this fact, let us remember another: the success and continuing life of a church is dependent upon the services of a pastor.

It seems to your committee that the words of Jesus, quoted at the beginning of the report, are an expression of the fundamental purpose of Jesus, and the explanation of the fact that he was rejected and crucified. Jesus came to be the servant of God's people. They did not want a servant. They wanted a ruler who would lead Israel back to its position of pomp and power.

The Church is not a master, but a servant. The Church is a servant of God to serve the people. The most subtle temptation which the human heart ever encounters is the temptation to put place and power ahead of service. It is a temptation which confronts institutions as surely as it does individuals. The Church of Christ is not immune to this temptation.

Before we can challenge the noblest of our youth to dedicate their lives to the service of God as ministers of His Church, we must demonstrate the fact that they can render a larger service to God in that capacity than in any other. The impression is abroad in the world that churches are more concerned with saving themselves than in saving the world for Christ.

During the past biennium your committee sponsored a special day, on which all our churches were asked to hold a special service emphasizing the challenge of the ministry. Pastors were urged to preach a sermon presenting the claims of the ministry. The results of such efforts are not immediately evident. We feel that efforts along that and similar lines should be continued.

The report of the Ministerial Loan Fund was given by Rev. W. Millard Stevens, as follows:

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL LOAN FUND.

The 1948 session of the Convention passed the following vote:

"That the Executive Board make plans for the restoring of the Ministerial Loan Fund to its original amount."

In accordance with this vote the Executive Board, October 12-13, 1948, appointed a special committee to investigate the history of the Ministerial Loan Fund, This Committee was composed of Mills E. Godwin, Jr., Chairman, Will B. O'Neill and H. S. Hardcastle.

This Committee made its report to the Board April 19, 1949 which was adopted subject to review and approval of the Convention in session. That report was as follows and it is made a part of our report to the Convention:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL LOAN FUND.

The Committee appointed by the Executive Board of The Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches to investigate the Ministerial Loan Fund, asks leave to submit the following report:

In view of the uncertain status of the Ministerial Loan Fund established by the constituent conferences of the Convention in 1920 and to provide for a clear-cut policy for the future disposition of said fund, in order to correct all past errors and omissions, and in line with the resolution in 1948, the Executive Board of said Convention requests the several conferences of the said Convention to concur in the disposition of the Ministerial Loan Fund as provided for in the 1948 session of the Convention on the following conditions:

- 1. That each interested Conference at its next session relinquish any claim to any funds that may have been pooled as the Ministerial Loan Fund and assign its interest in same to The Southern Convention.
- 2. That such funds be constituted and known as the Ministerial Student Loan Fund of The Southern Convention of Congregational and Christian Churches, Incorporated.
- 3. That Elon College be designated as the custodian of the funds of said Ministerial Student Loan Fund, ear-marking same as such, and that the custodian be required to have the funds audited annually and report made to the Executive Board annually and to The Southern Convention biennially.
- 4. That the said Ministerial Student Loan Fund be held and made available to Ministerial Students of the Congregational Christian denomination within the Southern Convention who are regularly enrolled at Elon College, or any other recognized college or seminary, provided the applicants are recommended by the local church of which the applicant is a member and by the Conference to which the church belongs.
- 5. That each applicant for a loan from the fund be required to execute a bankable note payable not more than one (1) year after date, with legal interest and provision for amortization, and that said note be renewed from time to time at the discretion of the Committee. The further provision shall be required that the beneficiary of the loan shall engage in the Ministry as a pastor within the denomination for a period of at least five (5) years after graduation from college or seminary, in which event the interest of said note shall be remitted.
- 6. That a committee from the Executive Board of the Southern Convention be appointed to pass upon applications for loans, order payment of same, and to handle and collect same when needed, and they shall report their actions to the Executive Board annually.
- 7. That this Committee wishes to express its appreciation to Rev. N. G. Newman, D. D., for his valuable and painstaking research into the Ministerial Loan Fund actions of the various Conferences and Convention sessions of our church.
- 8. That your committee strongly suggests that appropriate action be taken immediately to put all past due accounts in a current status.

9. That all the above proposals be submitted to the Southern Convention in session for final approval and action.

That the Convention Treasurer be authorized to settle all notes made prior to 1935 for 50 per cent of the face value of the notes and when settlement as herein stipulated has been made all interest due shall be cancelled," and that this special Committee bring to the Convention report and recommendations concerning this disposition of the unpaid notes and the restoration of the Ministerial Loan Fund to its original amount.

WEDNESDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

The session began at 2:30 with the hymn, "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus." The prayer was given by Rev. Fred P. Register.

The report of the Committee on Superintendent's Home was presented by Mrs. John G. Truitt, in the absence of Mr. George D. Colclough, Chairman, as follows:

COMMITTEE ON SUPERINTENDENT'S HOME.

Pursuant to the vote of the 1948 session of the Convention "that we approve the idea of building a Superintendent's Home and that the Executive Board be authorized to proceed with the project and to secure or erect the house and approve the method of financing the project," your Committee appointed by the Executive Board submits herewith the statement of its work.

Acting in close consultation with the Executive Board the Committee obtained a lot 75 x 200 feet on South Williamson Avenue, Elon College, North Carolina, and had erected a seven-room house. (Deed dated May 28, 1948, recorded Book 170 Dds., P157, Register of Deeds, Alamance County, July 6, 1948.) The work was completed and the Convention Superintendent's family occupied the house on October 1, 1948. An impressive Consecration Service was held at the home on October 12, 1948, in connection with the meeting of the Executive Board in session at that time.

The Executive Board authorized in the name of the Convention a loan of \$9,000.00 from the Church Building Department of the Board of Home Missions of Congregational Christian Churches, New York, to be repaid in quarterly installments over a period of 10 years. The loan bears 3% interest semi-annually (June 1 and December 1) on the unpaid balance. (As of March 2, 1950, the outstanding balance was \$7,875.00, with interest paid to June 1, 1950.)

The total cost for the house and lot was \$15,447.79. The financial statement attached will show the cost and receipts to December 31, 1949. It will be noted that a deficit of \$750.14 as of that date is being carried by the Convention Fund. A campaign is now under way to liquidate this deficit.

We feel the Convention received full value for funds invested in this worthwhile project. All churches, individuals, and the Woman's Convention which contributed to the project are due our appreciation.

The Superintendent's Home is the property of the Convention and will be used for

years as a real asset of our work.

The report of the Laymen's Fellowship was given by Mr. A. H. McIver. Pending action on the report an address was given by Hon. Mills E. Godwin, Jr., on the subject, "A Layman Looks Around."

It was voted that the address given by Mr. Godwin be published in THE CHRISTIAN SUN. Voted to receive the Laymen's report and make it a part of the Convention records.

REPORT OF THE LAYMEN'S FELLOWSHIP.

The biennium 1948-50 have been good years for the Laymen's Fellowship in the Southern Convention. We have not done all we wish we might have accomplished but we think we have done several things that should give us encouragement and help us to plan for the future.

During the fall of 1949 each Conference made a place on its program for a report of the Laymen's Fellowship activities within its Conference bounds. These reports were most encouraging. Practically all of our churches have some type of a laymen's organization. Many of them are doing a remarkable job for their local church and serving to help the entire church in its overall program.

During the latter part of January 1950 we observed special Laymen's Fellowship Day at Elon College. Every Conference in the Convention was represented and during the day more than 600 lamen attended a part, or all, of the program planned for that occasion. It was an inspirational meeting and we believe our men left with a determination to do a better job for their church.

We observed Laymen's Sunday on the third Sunday of October and over half of our churches had laymen participate in their services. This serves to emphasize the importance of a layman in the church, which we hope will encourage our laymen to shoulder their share of the responsibility.

^{*}From January 1 to June 22, 1950, through the effort of Mr. Colclough, Chairman of the Superintendent's Home Committee, the amount of \$647.25 has been collected in special gifts from churches and individuals, making the deficit \$102.89. Since June 22, 1950, faulty sewerage was corrected at a cost of \$228, making the actual defict to July 31, 1950, \$331.37.—W.T.S.

During the past year we prepared and mailed to our Laymen's Fellowship a Laymen's Handbook setting forth the principles of our Laymen's Fellowship, a copy of our constitution and bylaws, and other facts needed in establishing local groups. Conference and District Laymen's Fellowships are being organized and plans are under way for Churchmanship Institutes in several districts.

Again, we say we have not done all we wish we might have done during the past two years. We are encouraged by the accomplishments and interest of our men and we believe that the next two years will find us do more for our church.

The report of the Christian Orphanage was given by Dr. John G. Truitt, as follows:

REPORT OF THE CHRISTIAN ORPHANAGE.

The Christian Orphanage is making a home for 59 orphans and half-orphans and 17 from broken homes. They are given a good substitute for a Christian home—a child's best heritage. They are under the care of Christian men and women who love them and who work at their jobs as unto a sacred calling. They pray daily for wisdom to do their work well, and they pray for the children. The children are reared in a Christian atmosphere. They have their daily devotions, attend Sunday School and Church, and are taught principles which Christian parents would like for their own.

They are taught honor, integrity, cleanliness, fair play, good manners, gratitude, kindness, and the spirit of unselfish service to others. We do not claim any degree of perfection in these things, but we do make them the aim of our endeavors. We consider the children our job. We think of what we can do for them now, and try to consider what sort of parents they themselves may make in their lives ahead. Having been deprived of their own childhood homes, we try to repay them and prepare them for normal, useful lives.

The children are provided good clothes, nourishing food, and training in the public school. They are taught to play and work as a part of their equipment for life. Girls are given chores in the kitchen learning to prepare and serve food. They learn housekeeping and sewing, and are taught how to keep themselves and their surroundings neat and clean. The boys are given their chores on the lawns, farm, furnaces, dairy, poultry yards, and in the raising of hogs.

A complete record is kept of all funds received and expended. A monthly report is prepared and mailed to the members of the Board of Trustees. All bills and expenses are paid by check, which corresponds to itemized bills and vouchers, all of which is kept on file. The firm of Strand, Skees & Jones, Certified Public Accountants, render a complete audit of the books annually. Attached hereto is a summary of our financial standing. All reports are available for your use. This one has dealt with the children, as we feel that it is the main thing.

We pause in appreciation of the 33 years of outstanding service rendered the Convention and Orphanage by the late Chas. D. Johnston. We thank the Convention for all its help and cooperation.

The report of the Committee on Evangelism was given by Rev. R. A. Whitten, Chairman. Pending action on the report a panel on "Evangelism at Work" was presented by Revs. Thurman F. Bowers, James B. Allan and W. Walter Hall. Voted that the report be adopted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM AND DEVOTIONAL LIFE.

To the task o Evangelism the Church of Christ has been divinely called. The greatest undertaking ever given to man is the winning of souls for Christ. Evangelism is the primary and most important work of the Church. It is an appeal for personal decision, personal commitment of life and personal acceptance of that which God offers to man in Christ. Evangelism is an appeal for such decision as will involve the whole life—mind, will and affections—and make the presence and power of Christ a reality in personal experience. To the glorious task of making Christ known God is calling His Church.

Our denomination is one of forty denominations, representing millions of Christians, cooperating in a great forward march under the banner "America for Christ" as the "United Evangelistic Advance" aims to "Make Christ Known."

We recommend as our testimony and commitment to this task, the following, from a leaflet approved and presented by officers of the Southern Convention and compiled by the Convention Office:

"In testimony of our devotion of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior, and as an acknowledgement of the fulfillment of the promise of the Holy Spirit to us, we beseech you to join in covenant with God through Christ, and with one another. . . .

- "1. To enter into and to promote the United Evangelistic Advance in every church of the Convention from January 1 to December 31, 1950.
- "2. To seek to bring men and women, boys and girls to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ, and to the commitment of their lives to His service.
- "3. To consolidate the force of these decisions for Christ by enlisting them into the membership of His Church; and to this end seek a membership gain of at least ten per cent in each local church.
- "4. To practice and promote regular attendance at Church and Sunday School services for worship, spiritual enrichment and study; and the daily practice of private and family devotions.

"5. To give ourselves individually and collectively to achieve these high objectives, and to enlist every pastor, layman, woman and youth of our church in this *Evangelistic Advance*."

The report of the Committee on Stewardship was given by James F. Darden, Chairman:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP.

During this biennium the stewardship of our money has been emphasized by the local churches and their organizations more definitely than ever before. Pastors have taken the work of teaching the giving of our means as an expression of our worship of God and our joy in Christian gratitude more seriously. Laymen through their business meetings of the church and their boards of finance have followed the suggestion of their pastors and of their own good business judgment and have made budgets for their year's work, including larger items for the growth of their local church, and also more liberal giving to missions and benevolences beyond their local church. This comes as a result of work done along this line through the past several years by emphasis made by the stewardship committees in the Conferences of the Convention as well as that of the Convention itself. The superintendent of the Convention and the work of the central office has had much to do with this development. The call of various boards and institutions has made it necessary for us to think in terms of larger giving and better financial appeal.

Your committee wishes to take notice also of the growing interest of laymen and laywomen in the church, their deepening interest in the work of the Convention and the Conferences and every enterprise of the church. For a long time the women have been setting a good example in these matters. Now more than ever the men are organizing themselves and thinking more definitely for the progress of their churches. The young people, too, are taking on larger financial goals, and are making more definite contri-

butions toward their work.

We feel that this emphasis of the stewardship of our means is but an index to the stewardship of our time and our personalities. It all goes along together. We wish to recommend that during the coming biennium we give all encouragement possible to the growing application of better stewardship principles in local churches, the forming of more forward looking budgets, and the putting into practice better business methods in an ever-increasing number of our churches in the receiving and disbursing of their current and benevolent funds. For the sake of the growth of our churches, the development of new fields, and the sharing fully in our missions abroad we should strive earnestly to lay aside any half-hearted manner of laying our gifts upon the altar. Rather we should present both our gifts and ourselves in a fullness and devotion which would reflect a real interest in the development and growth of our Church.

We further recommend stewardship institutes both for our ministers and our layleaders; that we make full use of the Convention staff of workers, especially the services of our superintendent and our secretary of Christian education. They will gladly supply stewardship visual aid programs, teaching and stewardship materials. That we seek to make the coming biennium one of real advance in the gifts of our money, our

It is recommended that boards and institutions pay the amounts specified for The Christian Sun and the Operating Budget of the Convention Office in monthly installments; and that appropriations from boards and institutions to the Convention Office and the Board of Publications begin July 1, 1950, and run through the fiscal year ending December 31, 1952.

4. Elon College has made commendable progress and advancement in recent years. Its expanding program calls for larger and continued financial support.

We recommend that in addition to the regular apportionment for the College the Convention approve, and through its Conferences and Churches engage in an effort to raise a minimum average of \$1.00 per member annually for a sustaining fund for Elon College; this effort to be a cooperative one to be participated in by the college administration, the Elon College Foundation, the Convention, Conferences and church officials; that a committee be constituted by this Convention, the duty of which shall be to work for the Convention in cooperation with the officials named above, to formulate the plans whereby this proposal shall be carried to the entire constituency of the Convention.

5. We recommend that item 4 of the Report of the Finance Committee adopted by the Convention in its 1948 session, providing that the Mission Board transmit 25 per cent of its net income for the Convention Home Mission Fund to the Home Boards of the General Council, be rescinded.

We recommend that in lieu of the above item which is recommended to be rescinded that the Mission Board of the Convention determine the amount of the income for Convention Home Missions, which in the judgment of the Mission Board, should be sent to the Home Boards of the General Council, the amount to be proportionate to the askings from the Home Boards for the support of Mission work within the Convention.

- 6. We recommend that all churches be urged to raise their Missions and Benevolent Funds by securing subscriptions for their entire Conference Apportionments. Churches which do not raise their entire apportionments by means of subscriptions should receive a Special Offering for Missions at Easter, a special Thanksgiving Offering for the Orphanage, a special Christmas Offering for Superannuation, and a Special Offering for Elon College during the College Period. Until the regular contributions are sufficient to meet the apportionments, churches should seek to raise the apportionments in full by seeking special gifts from individuals.
- 7. We recommend the continuance of the present plan of regular monthly offerings for Missions and the Orphanage, and the Fifth Sunday Offering for Elon College to be taken by the Sunday Schools, until the amount of the apportionment for each shall be raised in full, thereafter all benevolent contributions from Sunday Schools should be allotted to the other items of apportionments which have not been raised in full. Contributions from Sunday Schools should be forwarded through the designated channls and credited on the respective Conference Apportionments.
- 8. We recommend that the Orphanage, the Mission Board and Elon College be authorized to make appeals for contributions, each during the period herein designated, as follows: Elon College—January, February, September and October; Missions—March, April, May and June; Orphanage—November and December; that Communion Offerings may be received for Superannuation; and that at Christmas a special offering may be taken for the "Christmas Fund for the Veterans of the Cross," said offering to be forwarded by the Board of Superannuation to the Division of Ministerial Relief as an emergency fund and extra appropriation to the superannuates. It is recommended that the practice of making appeals to churches, Sunday Schools, and auxiliaries for material or financial gifts at other times than during the periods designated, be discontinued.
- 9. We recommend that the Board of Christian Education be authorized to appeal for offerings on Children's Day from Sunday Schools, and from individuals during July and August.
- 10. We recommend that all funds contributed by churches, or by individuals who request their gifts to be credited to their churches, be transmitted to the Convention Treasurer through the Convention Office; that the Convention Office report such gifts to the Secretary of the Conference in which the local church holds membership; and that each local church secretary shall be furnished with a report of all funds sent from his church for Convention enterprises, together with the balances due.

- 1. We recommend that the awarding of scholarships to college and seminary students be the responsibility of the Board of Christian Education and that such scholarships be granted only to ministerial students and students who are preparing for other types of full-time Christian service who are properly certified and recommended by the conferences of which they are members; and that the Board of Christian Education make report annually to the Executive Board of the Convention, or to the Convention itself, relative to the status of the Scholarship Fund, and the scholastic achievements of the holders of said scholarships.
- 12. By vote of the Convention in its 1948 session, the reports of the Treasurer and the Convention Office were referred to the Finance Committee. Your Committee has examined those reports, together with reports made by the Treasurer and Convention Office through December, 1949. The audits of all these reports and Treasurer's books, made by Walter F. Owen, C.P.A., Burlington, North Carolina, have been examined and checked against the reports. To the best of our knowledge, we believe the said reports and audits to be correct; and we recommend their adoption.
- 13. We recommend that churches using the services of the Board of Pastoral Supply, Boston, Massachusetts, as aid in securing pastors, be urged to make a contribution to the Board of Pastoral Supply toward its expenses.
- 14. We recommend that the Convention Committee on Finance be increased to ten members: five to be appointed by the Convention, and five to be elected by the Executive Board of the Convention, and that the Committee on Finance be requested to hold semi-annual meetings.

The recommendations for the Revision of the Constitution and By-Laws were presented by Superintendent Scott. Upon motion the amendments were adopted.

REVISIONS OF CONVENTION CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.

Proposed Amendment to the Constitution of the Southern Convention:

The Executive Committee of the Executive Board of the Convention in special session on January 9, 1950, considered proposed changes in the Convention Constitution having to do with the duties of the Treasurer (Article VIII, Section 4, page 36 of the 1948 Manual) which now reads as follows:

"The Terasurer shall receive all funds through the Convention Office for the Convention and denominational enterprises, except for Conference interests, give receipt therefor, keep an accurate record of the same, shall deposit such funds in a depository designated by the Executive Board; shall disburse designated funds to Boards, Institutions, and other agencies at regular intervals on order of the Superintendent, and shall disburse funds for Convention obligations on order of the President of the Convention. He shall make reports to the semi-annual meetings of the Executive Board, to the biennial sessions of the Convention, and at such other times as may be requested by the Executive Board or the Convention. He shall be adequately bonded and his accounts shall be audited annually as determined by the Executive Board."

VOTED: "That Article VIII, Section 4 of the Constitution having to do with the duties of the Treasurer, beginning immediately after the semicolon and continuing through the remainder of the sentence be amended to read as follows:

"shall disburse funds for the Convention obligations as provided by the budget approved by the Convention or its Executive Board; shall disburse designated funds to Boards, Institutions, and other agencies at regular intervals; and may disburse for Boards and agencies their funds upon order of proper official of respective Boards or agencies." (The balance of the section remaining the same.)

VOTED: "That the Superintendent request the Secretary of the Convention to insert the above proposed amendment in *The Christian Sun* ninety days prior to the Southern Convention meeting, as provided by Article XV of the Convention Constitution on amendments.

Recommendations from the Executive Board:

- (1) That the Convention Bay-Law 3, paragraph 2, be amended so that the Convention fiscal year be the calendar year.
- (2) Under the present term of office for members of Boards of the Convention, there is an indefiniteness of tenure within some Boards, and in the case of the Boards of Publications and Suprannuation the terms of all members expire at one time; this being possible with the elective members of the Executive Board. We believe this to be an unwise practice.

We recommend that the terms of office tenure and the method of election of Board members be interpreted by amendment of the Convention By-Laws by the addition of Section 7A of the By-Laws as follows:

"The terms of office for members of the Mission Board, Board of Christian Education, Board of Publications, Board of Superannuation, and the Conference Representatives, and At-Large members of the Executive Board shall be four yars, and members of these Boards shall be divided into classes so that the term of a class shall expire every two years;

That members of said Boards who have served the equivalent of two full terms shall not be eligible for renomination and reelection for a period of two years after the expiration of the former term."

We recommend that this limitation of terms be interpreted to mean that those whose terms expire in 1950 and thereafter who have served one full term, shall be eligible to serve only one more full consecutive term.

We further recommend that the Executive Board be asked by the Convention to study the feasibility of limitations being placed upon tenure of members of the Trustees of Elon College and the Christian Orphanage and report their findings to the 1952 Convention.

Memorandum Concerning the Convention Constitution:

Attention is called to a printer's error in the Constitutional Amendments voted at Liberty Vance Church at the session of the Convention in 1948 as follows:

ARTICLE VIII—Officers, page 36 of the Manual, Section 3, entitled, "Election and Term of Office." The present reading is as follows:

"At least three months before each biennial session, the Executive Board shall elect a Nominating Committee. This committee shall nominate all officers of the Convention, but nominations may also be made from the floor for any office. Officers and Board members shall be elected to serve for the biennium unless otherwise designated, or until their successors are elected and qualified.

In the second sentence of this paragraph, after Convention, the recommendations of the Revisions Committee adopted had the following clause:

"Except for the Superintendent, who shall be nominated by the Executive Board, and the Editor of *The Christian Sun* who shall be nominated by the Board of Publications." So that the entire section should read as follows:

"At least three months before each biennial session, the Executive Board shall elect a Nominating Committee. This committee shall nominate all officers of the Convention, except for the Superintendent, who shall be nominated by the Executive Board, and the Editor of *The Christian Sun*, who shall be nominated by the Board of Publications. Nominations may also be made from the floor for any office. Officers

and Board members shall be elected to serve for the biennium unless otherwise designated, or until their successors are elected and qualified.

Duane Vore the Convention's special representative to convey our regrets to Mr. and Mrs. Fonville at Lakeview Hospital, Suffolk, and to send flowers in the name of the Convention.

An address, "Where, Whither, How?" was given by Dr. Ross W. Sanderson Director of Field Research, The Board of Home Missions, New York.

Rev. O. D. Poythress of the South Norfolk Church sang, "The Ninety and Nine."

The Convention sermon was delivered by Rev. Henry E. Robinson, using as his subject, "I Know That My Redeemer Liveth."

The report of the Committee on Memoirs was given by Rev. Herbert G. Councill, Jr., as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS.

Your Committee on Memoirs reports the following Ministers and Officials of the Southern Convention lost by death since the last session held April 27-29, 1948.

DR. FRANK H. LEWIS—Pastor of the Shelton Memorial Church, Portsmouth, Virginia. At the time of his death, Dr. Lewis was President of the Eastern Virginia Conference, President of the Portsmouth Ministerial Association, and a man beloved by all who knew him. Died August 28, 1949, at Massanetta Springs, Virginia.

REV. LUCIUS LEE LASSITER—A retired minister, living in Suffolk, Virginia. He was a member of the Eastern Virginia Conference. Died August 23, 1949.

REV. J. H. WARREN—A retired minister, died in Norfolk, Virginia, January, 1950.
REV. H. RUSSELL CLEM, D. D.—A retired minister, died in Burlington, North Carolina, July 30, 1949.

REV. J. S. CARDEN—A retired minister, died November 25, 1949, in Durham, N. C. Mr. Carden had served churches in Alamance, Durham, Granville, Caswell, Guilford, Chatham and Wake Counties, and at Buies Creek.

REV. MARTIN L. WEEKLEY, D. D.—A retired minister, died August 10, 1949, in Harrisonburg, Virginia. He was a member of the Valley of Virginia Conference. For many years Dr. Weekley served a number of Valley of Virginia Churches: Antioch, Beulah, Linville, New Hope, Bethlehem, Mt. Olivet (G) and Mt. Olivet (R).

REV. EDWARD F. GREEN, D.D.—A retired minister and educator, died February 26, 1950, in Southern Pines, North Carolina. Born in York, England, he came to this country as a young man.

The following are Lay Officials who have passed on during the past biennium:

Mr. John A. Williams—Member of the Congregational Christian Church of Franklin, Virginia, died April 21, 1949. Mr. Williams had served his local church as a deacon since 1916. He was a member of the Mission Board of the Southern Convention and of the Board of Trustees of Elon College.

MRS. CLAUD E. ELEY—A member of the Suffolk Christian Church, Suffolk, Virginia, died September 27, 1948. Elected in 1946 to the office of contributing editor to *The Christian Sun*, she was a former member of the Board of Publications of the Southern Convention, active in the work of the church women of the Convention and

in her local church. At the time of her death she was President of the State Federation of Woman's Clubs.

Mrs. D. P. Barrett-Missionary to Puerto Rico for 40 years and six months, finally settling in Chapel Hill, North Carolina in 1946, died July 22, 1948.

MR. CHARLES D. JOHNSTON—Superintendent of the Christian Orphanage for 33 years, member of the Elon College Community Church, and affectionately known throughout the Convention as "Uncle Charlie," died February 27, 1949. Mr. Johnston was also a member of the Board of Trustees of Elon College, as well as a loyal member of his local church.

MAJOR WILBUR E. MACCLENNY—Member of the Suffolk Christian Church, and former Historian of the Southern Convention, died March 3, 1950. A member of his local church since 1888, he served it as a Sunday School teacher, as a deacon since 1915, as a trustee for a number of years. He was the author of the Life of The Rev. James O'Kelly and The Early Christian Church in the South.

Your Committee on Memoirs calls upon the Convention to honor the memory of our departed comrades by standing for one minute in silent prayer thanking God for all fair memories of their lives among us, and for strength and courage to make us worthy followers of those who through faith and patience now inherit the promises.

THURSDAY—MORNING SESSION

The session was called to order by the President at 9:00. Hymn: "True Hearted, Whole Hearted."

Prayer by Rev. W. T. Madren.

Announcement was made of the death of Mrs. D. R. Fonville, Sr., Burlington, N. C., as the result of injuries sustained in an automobile wreck while enroute to the Convention. A special prayer for the family was given by Dr. John G. Truitt.

Upon motion it was voted that the President send an appropriate message of sympathy to the Fonville family and send flowers for the funeral in the name of the Convention.

The report of the Committee on Social Action was presented by Rev. Mack V. Welch, Chairman. It was voted to consider the report seriatim. Upon motion the report was adopted as a whole.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL ACTION.

It is in the field of our conduct one toward another—one person toward those of another group, race, or nation our Christian gospel is daily tested. The Church must lead the way in Christian thinking and acting in this realm. It is not enough to resolve when we are on the mountain top of experience in Convention or Conference and then to go away and forget our resolutions. We must courageously and wisely put our best thinking into practice.

We wish to recommend that we continue our historic practice of sending and receiving fraternal delegates within the Southern Convention area to and from like conventions and conferences of the Negro race. Our records show that such leaders as the late Dr. W. W. Staley, the two Wellons, Dr. J. O. Atkinson, and many others were received in Negro conferences, and that in turn fraternal delegates were welcomed by us from them.

We wish to recommend that our Convention follow the historic practice of taking a definite interest in and giving financial aid to Franklinton Center, which was once operated by our American Christian Convention and members of the Southern Convention as a Negro college, and is now being revived as a training ground for Negro ministers, lay leaders and young people. There is at Franklinton a real opportunity for Christian service, and one which has been the source of much fruitful cooperation and mutual help for several generations.

We recommend that our Convention go on record as favoring for the Negro race, (1) fairness in the news, (2) better housing, (3) justice in the courts, (4) equal consideration and facilities in public transportation, (5) rightful exercise of their franchise at the polls, and (6) the exercise of Christian courtesy and helpfulness in all our relationships with our fellowmen regardless of color, race or creed. We believe that progress is being made in mutual understanding and cooperation with other races and people and we would do nothing to hinder it, but rather we should consider it our Christian duty to hasten the progress being made. This whole problem should be the concern of the Church, especially for the development of the Negro race and for the leadership which America holds before the eyes of the world.

Our Convention has a duty to help in the matter of displaced persons. We recommend that we urge our conferences and churches to cooperate with the Committee on Displaced Persons established by our General Council helping in this matter to the extent of our ability.

We recommend that our Convention go on record reiterating our faith in training in the home, in the school, and in the church with respect toward better discipline, better preparation for Christian citizenship, and a finer respect for the rights and privileges of others.

The report of the Committee on Rural Church was presented.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE RURAL CHURCH.

In 1940 the Convention named a Committee on the Rural Church. The Committee brought in a very interesting report to the Convention in 1942. There has been little change in the general picture since that time. The churches in small towns and in some rural areas appear to be making some increase in church membership. Over the period from 1940 to 1948 our rural churches show a slight gain in membership. The Valley Conference had a loss of 13 members. The Eastern Virginia Conference had again of 58 members. The Western Conference had a gain of 110 members. The North Carolina and Virginia Conference had a gain of 79 members. The Eastern North Carolina Conference had a gain of 659 members.

Today we have the best trained ministry and laymen of any time in the history of

our church. This is encouraging.

One of the most hopeful signs in our rural church is the number of parsonages built or being built and the establishment of pastorates.

We recommend:

- 1. That we observe Rural Life Sunday.
- 2. That each rural church endeavor to have a Daily Vacation Bible School for a period of at least one week at a suitable time to the church.

- 3. That the evangelistic program be comprehensive and adequate to meet the need of the local community.
 - 4. That a program of stewardship be emphasized in all our rural churches.
 - 5. That the churches use visual aids as a means of inspiration and information.

Regular Pensions at the annual rate for last half of 1948, 1949 and continuing in 1950 totals \$4,283.00 for Ministers and \$1,453.00 for Widows; making a grand total per year of \$5,736.00.

In addition to the regular annual grants of \$5,736.00 the Division of Ministerial Relief mails to pensioners and others checks at Christmas time and at other times for emergencies. The funds for these extra checks come from the proceeds of the Christmas Fund of the Congregational Christian Churches.

It will be noted that our pensioners receive in regular grants and in extra checks from the Christmas Fund far more than we are contributing to the Division of Ministerial Relief of Board of Home Missions from Superannuation receipts. This fact is a real embarrassment to your Board of Superannuation. Dr. Frank J. Scribner and Rev. Percy C. Ladd of our Division of Ministerial Relief humble us by their understanding spirit. Always they seek to work for the welfare of our retired ministers and ministers' widows. We ought to be more generous in our gifts to Superannuation and the Christmas Fund.

It was further agreed that members of the Board might well write letters to churches in their own areas to encourage this support;

S. that the churches be encouraged to pay these apportionments in full and to exceed them wherever possible;

3. that all churches in the Southern Convention be urged to support the Christmass.

I. We recommend to the Finance Committee of the Southern Convention that the apportionment for Superannuation be increased to \$4,500.00 in order to meet the increase in pension grants (referred to Finance Committee);

6. We recommend that the treasurer of the Southern Convention be ex-officio a member of the Board of Superannuation and that he serve as its treasurer

The report of the Committee on Foreign Missions was read as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Strange as it may seem, there was a time, not long ago, when many people felt that we in America had no obligation toward Foreign Missions. Their theory was—
"The Lord will take care of the heathen"—thus trying to shirk responsibility.

In recent years we have awakened to opportunities offered us to send the gospel message to the uttermost parts of the earth, and otherwise to supply the needs of distressed fellowmen. We now think of missions without the adjectives home and foreign, but only as missions. Now that science has made the world one great neighborhood, let us as Christians through the Gospel of Christ work to make it a great brotherhood.

Your committee makes the following recommendations:

1. That we continue our support of Shaowu with our prayers and offerings.

2. That, in view of the excellent report from India given by Miss Manorama Powar of Bombay Province, we support in every way possible the work in India.

3. That we redouble our efforts in sending relief and the gospel to the distressed peoples of the world.

4. That we urge all the churches to support liberally the work of the American

Bible Society.

5. That this conference endeavor to raise the \$1,500 requested by the Southern Convention for missions.

We need to establish new church centers for the changing population, since many of our church people are locating in towns where we have no place of worship.

We have made some growth in membership, but we need a greater evangelistic We have made considerable gains financially, but we need to take more seriously what the Word of God has to say about tithing. We believe this would solve all of our financial problems and bring us into closer relationship with our Heavenly Father.

Since through the financial assistance given by the Mission Board of The Southern Convention, for the purpose of supplementing the salaries of our ministers, many of our churches have been encouraged to undertake much needed improvement; and since this in turn has created a new interest in the church; we are, in view of these facts, asking the Mission Board for \$1,200.00 for the conference year 1950-51.

RESOLUTION SETTING UP ELON COLLEGE SUSTAINING FUND. Adopted by The Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, May 3, 1950.

Elon College has made commendable progress and advancement in recent years.

Its expanding program calls for larger and continued financial support.

We recommend that in addition to the regular apportionment for the college, the convention approve, and through its conferences and churches engage in an effort to raise a minimum of \$1.00 per member annually for a sustaining fund for Elon College; this effort to be a cooperative one to be participated in by the college administration, the Elon College Foundation, the convention, the conferences and church officials; that a committee be constituted by this convention, the duty of which shall be to work for the convention in cooperation with the officials named above, to formulate the plans whereby this proposal shall be carried to the entire constituency of the convention.

Note.—The officers of the "Elon College Sustaining Fund" are: Hon. Mills E. Godwin, general chairman; Rev. W. Millard Stevens, co-chairman; Mrs. O. H. Paris, co-chairman; Hon. Shirley T. Holland, co-chairman; W. M. Brown, executive secretary.

On motion the resolution was adopted.

Dr. John G. Truitt addressed the conference on the Christian Orphanage, using as his topic: "Not in the Budget."

Miss Powar addressed the conference, using as her topic: "The Church in India."

A verbal report of the Committee on Stewardship was given by Rev. E. J. Rohart. He stated that he was ashamed of "my church, my conference and myself, that we have only talked about a new church and have done nothing about it."

A motion was carried that this conference go on record as favoring the purchase of a lot or lots in Harrisonburg to begin a new church.

Note.—At a joint meeting of the Executive and Home Mission Committees on September 29, 1950, at Bethlehem Church, R. O. Rothgeb, chairman of the Home Mission Committee, appointed Rev. E. J. Rohart, O. W. Andes and M. A. Dofflemyer to serve with him on a committee to make investigations about a lot in Harrisonburg.

A motion was carried that this conference make an earnest effort to secure at least 25% of its membership as tithers.

The report of the Committee on Religious Literature was read and adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

Literature has a great influence on the lives of the people in our homes. What we read either helps or hinders our moral and spiritual development. Therefore, we recommend:

 A more diligent study of the Bible, the basis of all religious literature.
 That each church appoint a Christian Sun representative who will endeavor to secure subscriptions.

3. That a wider use be made of the Missionary Herald and Children's Religion.
4. That our Sunday schools use our own literature put out by the Pilgrim Press, Boston, Mass.

Fogleman of the Western North Carolina Conference; Rev. G. M. Tally; Rev. R. Eugene Tally; Rev. W. Clay Farrell; Miss Pattie Lee Coghill, Educational Secretary of the Southern Convention; Dr. John G. Truitt, Superintendent of the Christian Orphanage; Dr. Howard T. Bozarth, pastor of the Elon College Community Church; Dr. W. T. Scott, Convention Superintendent, and Dr. Ross W. Sanderson of New York.

The report of the Executive Committee was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Your committee met by call of the chairman at Henderson, N. C., March 14, 1950, with all members present and the following visitors: Supt. W. T. Scott, President L. E. Smith of Elon College, and President John G. Truitt of the Southern Convention.

Dr. Scott read communications setting forth the purpose of the meeting, relating to the conditions existing within the United Church in Raleigh, N. C. The matter was discussed at some length, when Dr. Truitt suggested that we ask the pastor of the church, Rev. Frederick B. Eutsler, to a conference with the committee. This was accepted, and the committee was called in an adjourned session at Youngsville, March 21, 1950, at 2:00 p. m.

At this time, Mr. Eutsler being present made statement of his interpretation of the actions which lead to this seeming deadlock. The meeting closed after considerable discussion with no definite steps toward a solution.

It was decided that the president and secretary of the conference would have the authority to certify to the credentials of the delegates to the Southern Convention.

By vote the committee endorsed the work of Dr. Ross W. Sanderson within the conference and asked that the churches be notified as to time, etc.

It was voted that a special effort be made to reconcile the churches in the conference that have been inactive; and it was decided, first, to secure the cooperation of the pastors of these churches if possible. The meeting adjourned.

The committee was called to meet again on September 9, 1950, at Shallow Well. This was a joint meeting with the Executive Committee of the Western North Carolina Conference. Those present from that conference were Dr. F. C. Lester, Rev. W. W. Hall, and Mr. Geo. T. Gunter. Revs. G. M. Tally, R. Eugene Tally, and W. C. Farrell, being in waiting, were invited into the meeting. A special prayer for Divine guidance was offered by Rev. R. T. Grissom. Statements were made by Rev. R. T. Grissom, Dr. F. C. Lester and Rev. W. C. Farrell. After a legthy discussion as to the importance of a better understanding with the above named brethren, an agreement was entered into and signed by all concerned. This agreement is for a spiritual understanding and a brotherly co-operation in the interest of the Kingdom and for the good of the conference.

A meeting of the Executive Committee was called, and Rev. J. A. Denton, being in waiting, came before the committee. After a statement by Dr. Scott, Mr. Denton made a clear, definite statement concerning the rumors of the past. After discussion, it was voted that we continue Mr. Denton in our fellowship as a minister in good and regular standing. The meeting closed with prayer by Rev. T. Fred Wright.

The certificate of transfer from the Eastern Virginia Conference of Dr. Will B. O'Neill has been received, and we recommend that he be received into this conference in good and regular standing.

The report on Christian Education was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

The problems of our generation call for a more realistic teaching of the principles of Jesus Christ and a more courageous exemplifying of his teachings in all areas of life. It is becoming increasingly obvious that in order to avoid disaster we must turn back to the life-giving, yeasty fundamentals taught by Jesus and make them more regnant in our daily rounds. Bound together by a strong and reasoned faith, we will be better able to resist the common enemies of mankind and enter into the promised land of an ordered society. Unless we have an informed church membership, we can hardly hope to Christianize the world.

SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Here in the United States, our traditional and abiding freedoms give us a unique opportunity to utilize all available methods for religious teaching. Denominational and interdenominational facilities are available. For instance, training Sunday school teachers and church leaders for Christian education will be advanced greatly with the completion of a series of audio-visual materials to be used widely throughout the country. The kit of new tools for leadership education was developed by 18 denominations through the International Council of Religious Education. In the past our training has depended rather largely on printed materials, lectures and discussion, with slight use of this important technique which has been developed with great success by industry, public education and the armed services. With the new Leadership Audio-Visual Kit, however, Protestant churches will be able to use the miracle of sight and sound in the training of more effective teachers and officers.

Our churches in the Norfolk, Virginia, area are holding a leadership training institute this week. The courses are being taught by the local pastors. Plans are

being made for institutes in our conference during the coming year.

Many public schools are rapidly outgrowing their present quarters as enrollment increases. There is something wrong with our Sunday schools if they do not reflect the same trend. We heartily commend those churches that are making more adequate and up-to-date provision for their schools. Sanford recently completed a new and spacious educational plant. Southern Pines is planning for a new, modern structure. This movement should be accentuated widely, substantially, promptly.

ELON COLLEGE SUSTAINING FUND.

Sunday, October 22, is Elon Sustaining Fund Sunday. We recommend that this observance be held. The churches that do so are in line with Convention recommendations. They are helping to build a solid foundation for the total program of the Church.

We can be thankful that yonder at Elon are trained and consecrated teachers. They are our colleagues, our ambassadors to the royal court of higher learning.

The last one of us can give a lift to Christian education. We can deny ourselves of some frivolous privilege and make a greater investment in the realm of character education. This is the privilege of every public spirited citizen.

Why should one contribute to the Elon Sustaining Fund? Consider the relevance of this testimony by William Green: "To look on our life merely from the point of view of its utility is to ignore the requirements it makes on self-sacrifice and loyalty. A man conscious of the spirituality of the human soul is a man conscious of his obligations to his country and his fellow men, and he willingly gives the loyalty and makes the sacrifices that his citizenship demands. Our forefathers saw dangers ahead for democracy if freedom were divorced from morality. The experiences of our own time drive this truth home with dreadful urgency."

In this spirit and realization, therefore, let us observe and implement the Elon Sustaining Fund. Eastern North Carolina should lead the way for other conferences.

ROBERT LEE HOUSE. Chairman.

While the report was pending, Dr. L. E. Smith gave a verbal report on Elon College, and Dr. William Woseley Brown gave an interpretation of the Sustaining Fund. The report was then adopted.

Rev. Fred P. Register gave the report of the Sunday School Convention as follows:

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

The Sunday School Convention of the Eastern North Carolina Conference met at the Shallow Well Christian Church, near Sanford, July 12, 1950. Rev. W. J. Andes gave the feature address on "The Importance of the Sunday School." We had one of our best workshops for the Sunday school workers. This was due in part to the fine job done by the leaders: Dr. W. T. Scott, Dr. Robert Lee House, Miss Pattie Lee Coghill, and Rev. R. T. Grissom.

All this is fine and good, but we shamefully acknowledge that out of 47 churches we had only eighteen represented. We compare this with records of one year ago: Valley of Virginia, 19 of their 20 churches; Eastern Virginia, almost all of their churches reported; North Carolina and Virginia, about 95 per cent, and Western North Carolina, 19 out of 38,

We do not know of any church that is growing without a Sunday school. We do not think any Sunday school has all the answers, but believe the answer is in sharing our failures and our successes.

We have a Planning Committee that we are expecting good things from. Officers for next year are, Fred P. Register, president; K. G. Weldon, vice-president; Mrs. B. B. Johnson, secretary, and J. E. Branch, treasurer.

FRED P. REGISTER.

The report was adopted.

President Grissom spoke on the subject, "God's Handwriting in the Congregational Christian Church."

Communion service was conducted by Dr. Will B. O'Neill, assisted by Rev. Carl Wallace, Rev. J. Frank Apple, Rev. R. T. Grissom and Dr. R. L. House.

Conference adjourned for lunch. Prayer and benediction by Dr. John G. Truitt.

FIRST DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference was called to order by President Grissom. Hymn and prayer by Rev. W. C. Farrell.

"Our Mid-Century Advance," by Dr. W. T. Scott, Superintendent of the Southern Convention.

The report of the Committee on Evangelism was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM.

What is Evangelism? Whatever it is, it is the supreme task of the Christian Church. It is the propagation of the Christian faith by word and deed. The Christian Church must preach and live the "Living Word." According to John R. Mott, evangelism is "the process of bringing men into vital contact with Jesus Christ." The Christian Church began and continues to grow in a very simple fashion-witness bearing.

Our Lord has given to us the key. He preached an evangelistic sermon to the hungry-hearted Nicodemus. He gave His Great Commission to evangelize the world to a few earnest souls. They caught his passion and became aflamed with his Spirit. They went out in his name and won converts to the new way of life.

Have we not to a great extent, in this age of material progress, lost this passion and zeal for the lost that the Church possessed in the earlier days? The Church on her knees is a great power. Prayer changes things.

From Aaron N. Meckel's book, New Day for Evangelism, we quote: "Then, Church of the Living God, descend again to your knees in humble, believeing prayer, prayer that takes hold of the mighty powers of God and realizes them in self-forgetful service to a needy humanity! Then, like that first infant Church, you shall again appear before the eyes of unbelieving men, 'fair as the moon, clear as the sun, and terrible as an army with banners'! (Sol. 6:10.)"

Therefore we recommend:

1. That each church set a definite goal for the increase in church attendance and of church membership for the coming conference year.

2. That each Sunday school and church place special emphasis on developing the

spiritual life of their members.

3. That we urge the laymen of our churches to take a more active part in evan-

4. That we use every means available to win men to Christ and his Church.

J. FRANK APPLE, FRED P. REGISTER, J. A. DENTON.

After discussion by Revs. J. Frank Apple and Fred P. Register, the report was adopted.

The report on Home Missions was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

Our churches cannot have a strong outreach without a strong home base. One of the very encouraging events of 1950 was the coming of Dr. Ross Sanderson of the National Board of Home Missions to meet with the president of this conference, the chairman of this committee and others to make a survey of the churches in the Eastern North Carolina Conference. Dr. Sanderson is a specialist in the field of survey and reporting. He has not yet completed his studies. Dr. Sanderson came specifically at the request of the Regional Council of the Southeast, and he is covering every Southern State in which we have churches. At the initial meeting we made a rapid study of the churches, braking them down into classifications: open country, towncountry, city-urban, industrial center, or mill town, plus one town-tourist. Dr. Sanderson will return later to specific points that are representative of the different types.

This study should be of great value to the conference in determining whether or not it should and where it should establish new churches. The survey will give the conference a graph of its strong and weak points. It will further enable the conference to see at what points it should extend and where to retrench. After this study is completed, the conference should be ready to pool its resources for use wherever they may be needed.

The National Board of Home Missions stresses the work among migrants. This is of particular interest to us since migrant labor is used in our state, indeed in some of our counties. We aid migrant workers through our small contribution to the North Carolina Council of Churches. There is also a limited amount given through the Woman's Board of the Southern Convention.

No report would be complete without mentioning the work of the Woman's Missionary Conference. Their work is divided between foreign and home missions. A home project has been chosen for the 1950 Thank Offering, namely, the redecorating of Whitley Auditorium at Elon College. Another of their gifts is Friendly Service donation to Franklinton Center, our Negro training center, which lies within the bounds of this conference. The women adopted as their theme in 1949—"We Dedicate Ourselves"; and now in 1950—"Thy Will To Do." These might well serve as themes for the Home Missions Committee. Dedication of time, thought, money and work to establish points of home interest and the will to do it!

The American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions, representing our Congregational Christian Churches of which our conference is a part, is at work in twelve countries trying to meet the challenge of the needs around the world. We have a world parish of nearly 30 million of people, who are in need of Christ and who without our help may never hear his message. It is appalling, then when we read that we have fewer missionaries in all our mission fields to day than we had 30 years ago. So it is no wonder that the world is in such a chaotic state as it is when we as Christians have failed in this obligation.

Dr. David McKeith, Jr., executive vice-president of the American Board, has declared, "There can be no permanent growth of good will and peace on earth, unless we do our part in the liberation of all people from the bondage of hate and fear."

The Foreign Mission work is certainly a challenge to us, and may we of the Eastern North Carolina Conference accept it as such and do our part in helping to bring about a Christian world order, knowing that the future of it is in our hands.

Therefore, we recommend:

1. That we dedicate our lives and our possessions to God, giving as we have never before, for sacrifice is the fruit of love.

2. That our pastors emphasize missions more, knowing that the success of our

foreign work depends on our home churches.

3. That all members read *The Christian Sun, The Missionary Herald* and other missionary magazines so as to keep informed of the needs of the mission work.

4. That we all join together to do greater work in the coming year, trying to fulfill Jesus' Commission, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature."

MARGARET ALSTON, SUSIE ALLEN, MRS. J. FRANK APPLE.

Miss Pattie Lee Coghill spoke on the subject, "Our Youth at Work." The report was then adopted.

By motion the secretary was instructed to convey to Mr. J. A. Kimball a message of greetings and best wishes.

The Committee on Nominations submitted the following report:

REPORT OF NOMINATING COMMITTEE.

By motion the report was adopted and the secretary was instructed to cast the ballot, which was done and each nominee was declared elected to his respective office for the ensuing year.

The report of the Committee on Education and Standing of the Ministry was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION AND STANDING OF THE MINISTRY.

We, your committee, report, that according to the 1949 ANNUAL, this conference does not have a student in the Biblical Class at Elon College. It is a sad fact that we are not producing enough ministers to supply the pulpits of our churches.

May we look on the field that is white unto harvest and pray that the Lord

will call, and send, laborers to work for the coming of his Kingdom.

We recommend:

1. That Rev. Carl Wallace be received as a member of this conference on transfed from the North Carolina and Virginia Conference.

2. That Rev. George M. Talley be received as an ordained minister in good

and regular standing into this conference.

3. That the former Western North Carolina Conference licensures, Brothers R. Eugene Tally and W. Clay Farrell, be recognized and that they be given Conference

Ordination at this session of conference.

We note with regret that several ministers in this conference do not attend the annual session of conference nor make a report to the conference. We call attention to page 22, chapter 2, section 2, and paragraph 6, in The Manual of the Southern Convention regarding the duties of ministers, which reads as follows: "It is his duty to be present at every annual meeting of the conference and submit a written report of his labors. If prevented from attending, he shall report by letter."

FIRST DAY—EVENING SESSION.

Devotional services were conducted by the young people of the host church. Sermon by Rev. Carl Wallace.

In a very inspiring service, Revs. R. Eugene Taley and W. Clay Farrell were ordained to the Gospel ministry as Conference Elders. Rev. E. M. Carter extended the right hand of fellowship, followed by all the ministers present, and the members of conference.

Conference adjourned to meet Wednesday morning at 9:30.

Prayer and benediction by Rev. R. Eugene Tally.

SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION.

Conference was called to order at 9:30 a.m., by President Grissom.

Devotional services were conducted by Rev. J. Frank Apple.

The minutes of Tuesday's sessions were read and adopted as corrected.

The report of the Committee on Religious Literature was presented, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

Year after year, succeeding committees have presented their report on Religious Literature, drawing attention to the value of selecting the best literature, past and present, for the furnishing of the mind and the quickening of the human spirit, that we might prove ourselves "as workers that needeth not to be ashamed."

Your committee can only re-emphasize that which has been said so many times before, and respectfully submit the following recommendations:

- 1. That the Bible be given the place of primary importance in our reading. That we study it diligently and devotionally and thus give Christ the opportunity to open to us its rich treasures that we may become men and women of the "burning heart."
- 2. That we seek some method by which The Christian Sun shall find its way, each week of its publication, into every home of our Church within the bounds

of this conference. It carries such a wealth of material for our information and inspiration that not one of our homes should be without it.

- 3. That our denominational papers—Advance, The Missionary Herald, Pilgrim Youth and Social Action deserve a much wider reading by our constituency and we would therefore urge our pastors to bring these periodicals to the attention of our churches.
- 4. That those of our churches which are not using the Sunday school lesson materials published by our own denomination give serious thought to the questions of denominational loyalty and support. We are awere of the complaints that these lesson materials are "too difficult" or "not suited to the needs of our smaller Sunday schools," but we are sure that every difficulty can be overcome by intelligent persistence. We know of no better materials published than those by the Pilgrim Press and we therefore recommend their use by all of our Sunday schools.

Miss Pattie Lee Coghill gave a brief report of the Woman's Missionary Conference.

The report of the Committee on Stewardship was presented, and after discussion by Drs. W. B. O'Neill, W. T. Scott and Howard B. Bozarth, was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP.

There is confusion in many minds regarding this question of Stewardship. To some people it means tithing, or giving the tenth of one's income to the work of the Kingdom, but this is a very limited interpretation of all that is involved in Stewardship. The great fact of the Christian faith is that God gives himself to us completely in Jesus Christ and in response to that gift we should give ourselves to him. That is what Stewardship is, the giving of all of our life to God, that he might work out his purposes in our lives. Without a sense of stewardship there can be no real and vital Christian experience.

Stewardship is partnership in the divine enterprise of bringing the Kingdom of God into the hearts of all men. Stewardship is obeying the command of Jesus to "go into all the world and preach the gospel" Stewardship is feeding the hungry and clothing the naked; opening the eyes of the blind and setting the captive free.

The indescribable needs of the world today cry out for a renewed and deeper sense of Stewardship on our part. Only through the consecration of men and women who recognize the claims of Jesus Christ upon their time, talents and abilities, can the world be saved.

We, therefore, recommend:

- That our ministers conduct Stewardship institutes in their churches, teaching Stewardship in all of its broader aspects.
- That each church accept its responsibility for a part in Our Christian World Mission.
- That each church use the wealth of stewardship material prepared by the Missions Council.

WILL B. O'NEILL, K. D. WELDON, ODELL ARNOLD.

The report of the Committee on Superannuation was presented and, after discussion by Leland Johnson, Rev. F. B. Eutsler and Dr. W. T. Scott, was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUPERANNUATION.

One of the best fruits of the Christian way of life is the constant sense of re-

sponsibility for the unfortunate—for the widows and orphans and the aged.

While the aged ministers may represent no more of a responsibility than the least member of the congregation—and most of these ministers would no doubt put the other members of the congregation ahead of themselves—the very fact that our pastors set an example for their congregations makes it desirable that the congregations set an example in taking care of their pastors.

So far as most of us are concerned, there is one offering per year for the aged ministers in general. The rest is left to others. The overall record is no compliment

to our degree of Christianity! This should make us think.

We might add that one of the outstanding characteristics of the present economic age is the tremendous emphasis on social security. Nearly every well-established business firm has some form of voluntary retirement plan, and the government is rapidly moving in to cover those gaps which are left open.

The manner in which we have handled our ministerial retirement plan casts a

serious reflection on our judgment as business men. That hurts our pride!

What has been done constructively?

There is the once-a-year Christmas collection which is usually taken at about the same time that local welfare and goodwill baskets are being collected. Both projects should obviously be continued, but special emphasis should be put on superannuation, even if it is necessary to take another Sunday following Christmas or about the first of the year.

There is one business-like retirement program. It is the Annuity Fund for Congregational Ministers. While this fund has a \$5,000,000 plus backlog, the income of which is distributed free to participating ministers, it is inadequate to take care of the total burden without help from the churches and the ministers themselves.

In the Eastern North Carolina Conference, only seven of the 18 or 20 ministers

serving our 47 churches are members.

We, therefore, recommend that the "standing committee" on superannuation be directed to act as an executive committee to find out why all ministers cannot be included.

In some cases there is insufficient understanding. This should be cleared up. In some cases there is a financial hump. This should be gotten arround. If insurmountable obstacles should be encountered, either for some of the ministers or some of the congregations, the advisabilty of including ministers on the standard State Social Security program should be investigated.

GLENDON JOHNSON, I. H. VICKERY, PHELLIP J. WEAVER.

By motion, the report of the North Carolina Council of Churches was received and admitted to record as follows:

REPORT ON NORTH CAROLINA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES.

The North Carolina Council of Churches met in the Methodist Church in Salisbury on September 28. The following officers were elected: Dr. Clyde A. Milner, president; Gurney P. Hood, vice-president; Dean J. H. Satterwhite, vice-president; Mrs. E. L. Hillman, vice-president; Mrs. Aubrey Muney, recording secretary; Mrs. A. H. White, recording secretary emeritus; Mrs. Bert Hobgood, treasurer.

Many of us, I am sure, are not familiar with the North Carolina Council of

Churches. The purpose of the council is threefold:

First: To promote fellowship and mutual understanding among the followers of Christ constituting the several communions of North Carolina; Second: To serve as a medium of interchurch advice and counsel on matters affecting the program of Christianity in the state, and Third: To associate the communions in such joint services as may achieve more effectively the object of the Christian religion.

Outstanding, in my thinking, is the work being done in helping provide qualified teachers of Bible for the public schools. As you know, the Bible can be taught as an elective in our schools, provided the teacher is not paid from tax money. The council serves as a clearing house for these teachers and has record of all such teachers in

the state.

Another work which is most helpful is the ministry for the migratory workers. These people, who are ever moving, naturally cannot receive spiritual strength through the regular churches. Therefore, the council has helped provide a qualified man and a jeep station wagon to go with the migratory workers.

The council takes an active part in overseas relief and in many ways tries to

be the channel for all churches in ministering to the needs of our world.

Here is the big argument for the council. It provides an opportunity for other Christians and ourselves to either do work we could not do separately or at least not

do effectively or efficiently alone.

The council is young and may stumble, but I believe it needs our paternal care, and that as it grows it will provide more ways for us to do our work better for our blessed Lord and Savior. On this basis, I recommend to the Finance Committee that they include in their budget \$100.00 for the North Carolina Council of Churches.

FRED P. REGISTER.

Supt. John G. Truitt spoke of the work and needs of the Orphanage.

It was moved and carried that we continue the program and finish our work before lunch, closing at 1:30 p.m., or earlier if possible.

The Committee on Finance made its report as follows:

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee on Finance submits the following report:

We have examined the Treasurer's Report and books and find them to be correct.

We recommend that the treasurer pay President Grissom \$43.60 for traveling expenses and postage.

We recommend that the secretary be paid \$50.00 for services and \$9.40 for postage. We recommend that the treasurer pay for printing the programs, when bill is submitted.

We recommend that the treasurer be instructed to pay the Board of Publications for printing The Annuals.

We recommend that the treasurer be instructed to pay \$50.00 to the North Carolina Council of Churches.

CHAS. A. BALLENTINE, Mrs. J. M. YODER, J. FRANK APPLE.

By motion the report was adopted and the treasurer instructed to pay the bills mentioned.

The report on Apportionments was presented and discussed by A. H. McIver and then adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON APPORTIONMENTS.

It is recommended that the attached apportionment table reflecting a total increase of approximately five and one-half per cent be approved by the conference and accepted and paid by the churches.

The action of the Southern Convention at its session last May is our authority for this slight increase. It will be noticed that increases ranging from \$3 to \$29 per church have been added for the Convention Fund and from \$2 to \$23 per church for the support of our church paper, *The Christian Sun*. All other items remain unchanged.

We recommend that all churches begin early and make regular payments throughout the year until the entire amount has been paid. Such action will make the task easier and more pleasant and will result in more efficient operation of all of our church institutions and benevolences.

The report on Social Action was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL ACTION.

We believe society can be changed only in so far as the individual comes into the right relationship to Jesus Christ. We believe this to be the foundation on which any improvement in our society must be built.

Acknowledging this fact, we recommend that the church be to its community what the conscience is to the body. We urge that it take a public stand on an evil

that threatens the moral standards of its youth or other folks. We urge that our churches fight the legal sale of alcohol and that they fight any so called amusement centers that tear down character. We believe it a sin to be a non-committer when such evils are confronted.

We urge that the church remember its Lord and strive to keep his spirit in dealing with conflicts between creeds, races and classes. We do not claim to be able to give a specific Christian answer for these questions. We do know our Lord loved rich and poor and it is his will to save both. The church should be fair to both parties in any case of misunderstanding, but it should not compromise with evil.

You folks know there is a war in Korea. You know there will be rebuilding; and, you know who will have to do it. It is rather easy for us to give to the Orphanage, often difficult to give to orphans and widows in other lands. Yet they have need, and to whom can they go.

Social action involves the whole of Christian living. That it is essential is first found in God's word. "Faith without works is dead." It is also one of our five cardinal principles, "Christian character shall be the test of Christian fellowship."

The Program Committee presented the printed program, and on motion it was voted that this be our procedure for this session of conference with such changes as may be found necessary.

The report of the Committee on Christian Education was presented by Rev. W. Millard Stevens and, pending the adoption of the report, an address was given by Dr. L. E. Smith, president of Elon College, on "The Future of the Church College." Dr. Smith presented Rev. Duane N. Vore, Eastern Virginia chairman of the Sustaining Fund for Elon College, who spoke briefly about the importance and necessity of the churches taking action and supporting the Sustaining Fund.

The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

The Prgram Committee of the Conference requested the undersigned to write a report on Christian Education for this session of Conference. This means that the limit of this report will be rather obvious since I have not been concerned during the year to collect information for such a report. However, all of us must recognize that Christian Education is a vital part of the life and the work of our churches and we must constantly keep this in mind if our churches are to meet their full responsibility to the people and to the Kingdom of God.

Leadership Education should be the first concern of our Christian Education program. We are able to report that on the local church level this has been a concern in our conference within the past year. Last February, through ahe cooperation of the Board of Christian Education of the Convention, a Leadership Training school was conducted in the Suffolk area and one in the Norfolk area of our conference. Both of these schools received fair support from the churches and were very much worthwhile. Plans are now under way for a similar school in the Suffolk area for this year and

one has already been conducted in the Norfolk area during the period October 15 through 19. In all these local Leadership Training Schools one of the primary weaknesses is the fact that representatives from only a few churches in each area attended the schools and the churches which need the training most are the one who never attend. We urge our churches to take advantage of these Leadership Training schools.

The second concern in the field of Christian Education manifests itself through the work of our Sunday schools. All of us are constantly aware of the fact that our Sunday schools are not as effective as they should be. Some of our defects can be overcome if we would be more serious in our efforts to discover our weaknesses and means of overcoming these weaknesses. We should always be alert to seek new means of making our Sunday schools real organs for developing the Christian lives of our young people. We would like to urge each Sunday school to examine its program during the next year and seek to build a more effective instrument for Christian Education through its program.

A third area of concern should be in the matter of information and education with reference to the whole program of the denomination and the work of the church around the world. It is ever obvious to any thinking person that most of our difficult problems in the local church could be relieved in large measure if the people were better informed in the matter of churchmanship. There is no excuse for ignorance even in the

church in this day.

A fourth concern should interest us in the matter of Christian Education is our own institution of higher learning—Elon College. It is not necessary to say that we ought to support our college with our young people, our money and our prayers because we are constantly reminded of this year after year. It is time that we should begin to take this matter more seriously. At the last session of the Convention a program was authorized to make possible a sustaining fund for Elon College over and above our regular apportionments. This program has been organized and is now under way. It provides that there should be observed in each local church once each year a Sustaining Fund Sunday, at which time the congregation would be asked to bring a special offering for the College equal to \$1.00 per member of the local church. This Sunday would be observed either in October or January or February. The Committee of the Eastern Virginia Conference has suggested that the churches in Eastern Virginia observe this Sunday either in January or February. We urge your support of this sustaining program for Elon College.

Finally, we call your attention to the fact that the Board of Christian Education of our Convention is always anxious to be of assistance to all our churches in the matter of Christian Education and we would welcome an opportunity to serve you.

The report of the Committee on Ministerial Education was read by Dr. H. S. Hardcastle and, pending its adoption, an address was given by Dr. Douglas Horton, in which he reviewed the reasons why men enter the Christian ministry. Supt. W. T. Scott also spoke concerning the need for more ministers in the Southern Convention and urged the churches to prayer and counseling in the hopes that more men will enter the ministry.

The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

In presenting this report, we the members of the Committee on Ministerial Education simply emphasize again the need for consecrated, well-trained ministers of the gospel, the necessity for presenting in public and in private the call and the challenge to the ministry, the need for enlisting promising young men in preparation for the ministry, and the encouragement in every way of those who are preparing themselves for the ministry. We would emphasize again that our Lord emphasized the fact that prayer was a vital means of securing workers for the Kingdom. We should be instant in season and out of season that the Lord of the harvest might send forth laborers who gladly and effectively do His will.

The Committee has met several times during the year, and herewith submits a

report of its ad interim activities:

1. We granted a letter of Ministerial standing in behalf of Rev. Peter Young to the Suffolk West Association in Massachusetts.

2. We received into our Conference, by letter, Dr. R. C. Helfenstein, who came

to us from the Iowa Congregational Christian Conference.

3. We recommend to the Executive Committee of the Conference, that Rev. Henry M. George be received as a member of the Conference with the status of Conference

Ordination, if and when he became a pastor of a church in this Conference.

4. We recommend to the Executive Committee that Baxter Twiddy, a member of the Biblical Class at Elon College for four years, be licensed as a minister of the gospel. And upon recommendation of the Executive Committee after approving of our recommendation, we arranged for a service of Licensure for Mr. Twiddy on September 18, 1950, at Suffolk, Virginia.

We respectfully submit these actions of your Committee for approval by this

Conference in session.

We further recommend:

1. That Rev. A. Lanson Granger, Jr., Rev. James H. Lightbourne, Jr., Rev Cecil Thomas, Rev. Melvin Dollar, Rev. H. E. Crutchfield, Rev. W. Millard Stevens, Rev. Jesse H. Dollar, Rev. W. A. Grissom, Rev. V. T. Crawford, be received as Ministerial Members of the Conference on the basis of Certificates of transfer from their respective Conferences duly presented to our Conference Secretary.

2. That Mr. Henry M. George be granted Conference Ordination and that the President make provisions for that service of Conference Ordination at this session of

the Conference.

3. That the Conference Ordination of Revs. D. D. Nash, John Gallo and M. E.

Taylor be renewed for another year.

4. That letters of transfer be given John L. Gwinn and B. H. Watkins to unite

with their respective Methodist Conferences.

5. That Paul Varga and John G. Truitt, Jr., be continued as members of the Biblical Class at Elon College, and that they be granted the designated share of the Educational Fund for Ministerial Students from Eastern Virginia at Elon, this amount to be credited by Elon College on their College expenses.

6. That Vivian Harrell and H. Allan Gleason, Jr., be continued as Licentiates of

this Conference.

7. That the licensure of M. A. Carson be revoked, in view of the fact that he has been enrolled as a minister in another denomination.

8. That Baxter Twiddy be granted One Hundred Dollars in cash to be applied on his expenses at Chicago Theological Seminary.

We also submit a Financial Statement of the Funds committed to our trust, as reported by the courteous and efficient treasurer of the Conference, Mr. G. C. White.

The report of the Committee on Apportionments was given by the chairman, Mr. Shirley T. Holland, and, pending its adoption, Mr. Holland urged the churches to accept it as a goal to be achieved. He emphasized the needs of our Southern Convention enterprises and asked that all our churches support them to the best of their ability.

The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON APPORTIONMENTS.

We, your Apportionment Committee, submit the accompanying table of apportionments for the year 1950-51. The amounts set forth in this schedule being requested by the Southern Convention.

The Convention Fund has been increased \$1,050.00 and The Christian Sun has been set up under a new heading for \$700.00. Your Committee regrets that the churches were not notified of this increase prior to the making up of their budgets for the present Conference year. The Committee was not notified of this increase until the middle of October, and then it was too late to notify the churches of this increase.

The Southern Convention by resolution adopted this year recommends that in

addition to the regular apportionment for the College the Conferences and Churches engage in an effort to raise a minimum average of \$1.00 per member annually for a sustaining fund for Elon College. We are convinced that you cannot make a better investment than that of investing in young people for Christian Training so that they will be equipped to take their place in our Communities and our Nation. The age in which we are living needs Christian leadership in our Churches, in business and in Government. Elon College provides this training. We urge you to show your faith in Elon College by contributing at least one dollar per member for the Sustaining Fund of your College.

Dr. C. E. Newman was presented to the conference and spoke about the need for funds in carrying forward the work of the "Rev. James O'Kelly Cemetery Foundation."

The report of the Historian was read and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF HISTORIAN.

Some Ministers I Have Known. 1872 - 1922.

MILLS BURWELL BARRETT.

Mills Burwell Barrett was the son of Rev. Mills Barrett and the grandson of Rev. Burwell Barrett, a pioneer with Rev. James O'Kelly in the Christian movement. He was reared in Southampton County and was a member of the old Barrett's Church. He was ordained at Antioch Church, Isle of Wight County, in 1850, the ordination sermon being preached by Rev. Isaac N. Walter of Ohio. He labored for two or three years in the Georgia and Alabama Conference. Then served Jerusalem and Providence in Norfolk, County, Virginia. Later he served Spring Hill, Barrett's and other churches in Southampton County. He was President of this Conference for many years and presided with grace and dignity. He had a fine physique and stately manner; was a gifted orator and at times preached with great power. In his early ministry he was a popular evangelist and conducted many great revivals. He died in 1891 at the age of 63.

JESSE T. WHITLEY.

Rev. Jesse T. Whitley was from Antioch, Isle of Wight County. He had a fine intellect, was studious, and became the most scholarly minister in the Conference. He was reserved and dignified in manner, and clear and concise in speaking and writing. He was pastor of Antioch, Spring Hill, Suffolk and other churches, and at one time edited *The Christian Sun*. He united with the Virginia Methodist Episcopal Conference in 1878, was appointed to important churches and became a Presiding Elder. He kept in sympathetic touch with the people of his first love and preached his last sermon, as he did his first, in the Suffolk Christian Church. He spent his last years in Norfolk and edited a religious column in the *Virginian-Pilot*.

ROBERT HOWELL HOLLAND.

Mr. Robert Howell Holland was born in upper Nansemond County 131 years ago. He was first a member of Holy Neck Church, but later was identified with Hebron and Holland. He was a studious youth and acquired a good education. He wrote contracts, wills, deeds, and speeches for his neighbors. He was ordained in 1852. He did much itinerant preaching and was later pastor of Holy Neck, Union (Southampton), Damascus, Hebron (which he organized) and Holland. He retired from the pastorate in 1873, but continued somewhat active for 25 years filling appointments for others, conducting funerals, performing marriage ceremonies, visiting the sick, writing for papers, and working in his home church. He wrote a biography of Dr. W. B. Wellons—a 448-page volume, published in 1881.

He organized Corinth Chapel and Laurel Hill Colored Christian Churches; and helped in the organization of Zion Colored Christian Church. He gave the land for the Laurel Hill Church and his interest in the organization helped its growth. He helped to organize the Eastern Virginia Colored Christian Conference and assisted in

the ordination of Justin Copeland, the first colored Elder in this area.

Through his influence and financial help, Hebron, at Carrsville, when about to suspend, was moved to the new village of Holland. The Holland Christian Church, one of our largest and finest semi-rural churches, is a monument to his wisdom and labor. He was active in this church until enfeebled by age; attending all its services and enjoying the fruits of his labor. He died in 1908, leaving more tangible and permanent results of his ministry than any of the more gifted preachers of his day.

EDWIN WILLIAMS BEALE.

The Reverend Edwin Williams Beale was from Southampton County and was a member of Union Church. He was educated at Graham Institute, Graham, N. C., under the kindly labors of Rev. John R. Holt and Rev. Albert G. Anderson, two great teachers of that day. He was a fine student and made rapid progress. He taught and clerked until licensed at the Bethlehem Church in 1856. He was ordained at Antioch in 1857. He was appointed an itinerant to the "Lower District," which included Liberty, Jerusalem, Providence and Pleasant Ridge. He transferred to the North Carolina and Virginia Conference in 1861 and was a prominent pastr and official until 1872; serving New Providence, Union Ridge, Shallow Well and Mt. Zion Churches.

He returned to the Eastern Virginia Conference in 1872 and served Cypress Chapel, Damascus, Berea (Nansemond), Oakland, Antioch, Bethlehem and Windsor. He served the best churches and received the largest salary—\$850.00—at a time when the average salary was \$300.00 to \$400.00. He was Superintendent of the Suffolk Collegate Institute for two years and did hard and fruitful work for that institution. He was an untiring worker; loyal to every enterprise; and a loving and faithful pastor. He had the most saintly appearance I have ever observed and his very presence emanated a spiritual influence. He encouraged young men preparing for the ministry, gave them material help and inspired them with his spirit. He was the one who led the late John U. Newman into the Oakland Christian Church, encouraged him to enter the ministry, took him into his own home, and gave him wise counsel and fatherly care. Mr. Beale died in 1881 at the age of 63 years.

JOHN T. KITCHEN.

John T. Kitchen was another of our prominent ministers from the Union Church in Southampton County. He was educated at the Suffolk Collegiate Institute and

ordained in 1875. In a ministry of thirty years he served Cypress Chapel, Hebron, Union (Southampton), Isle of Wight, C. H. (which he organized), Liberty Spring, Mt. Carmel, Windsor, Eure, Oakland, and other churches. His appearance was striking. He was large, tall, erect, dignified in his bearing, and chaste and elegant in his language. He was aesthetic, reveled in the beauties of nature, and sought the beautiful in language and literature. His exemplary life and kindly spirit commanded respect and made him an influence for good. He died in Windsor, Virginia, in 1921.

JOHN PRESSLEY BARRETT.

Mr. John Pressley Barrett was from Antioch in Isle of Wight County and was educated at the Suffolk Collegiate Institute and Richmond College. He was licensed in 1873 and ordained in 1875. His chief pastorates were Antioch, Providence, Berea (Norfolk), Raleigh (N. C.), Memorial Christian Temple, Covington (Ohio) and Reidsville (N. C.). He owned and edited The Christian Sun for 13 years and edited the Herald of Gospel Liberty for 12 years. He loved editorial work, was a prolific writer, ready debater, and champion of the traditional view of the Bible.

He was better educated than most of our ministers of that time. He was a man of the strictest moral integrity, possessed great loyalty and zeal and soon became the leading minister of the Conference. In pulpit and press he vigorously advocated and promoted every enterprise of the Church. His pulpit utterances were forceful and effective. He died at Winston-Salem, N. C., in 1924, at the age of 72 years.

JOHN URQUHART NEWMAN.

John Urquhart Newman was born in Portsmouth, Virginia, in 1860, and died at Elon College, N. C., in 1942 at the age of 82. He was a delicate lad and could not stand hard work on the farm and continued frail throughout his life. He was from the Oakland Church and was educated at the Suffolk Collegiate Institute, University of North Carolina, and Yale. He was licensed in 1878 and ordained in 1883. He was associated with Professor P. J. Kernodle at the Suffolk Collegiate Institute in 1883 and 1884. He graduated from the University of North Carolina in 1885, taught one year at Antioch College in Ohio, four years at Graham College, Graham, N. C., and then went to Elon College in 1890 and taught there the remainder of his life. He served as Dean for Elon College for several terms and taught Greek and Bible for about fifty years. He also served churches in Virginia and North Carolina.

While at the Suffolk Collegiate Institute he served Berkley and Spring Hill; and while teaching at Graham and Elon College he served New Providence, Pleasant Hill,

Liberty, Burlington, Elon College, and Union at Virgilina, Virginia.

His life was characterized by gentleness of spirit, forgetfulness of self and sacrificial help to others. He is remembered as an educator rather than a preacher.

HARRISON HOLLAND BUTLER.

The Suffolk Collegiate Institute also provided the educational advantage received by Harrison Holland Butler from the Mt. Carmel Church in Isle of Wight County. He was licensed to preach in 1876 and ordained as an Elder in 1879. Among his early pastorates were Berkley, Providence and Berea in Norfolk County. He grew rapidly in favor and usefulness and was at one time the most popular minister in the Conference. He moved from Berkley to Suffolk in the eighties and served Bethlehem, Cypress Chapel, Antioch and Oakland.

His education was somewhat limited and he was never a student. However, he was richly endowed by nature with a pleasing personality, affectionate disposition, a strong mellow voice and the gift of oratory. Under emotional stress he sometimes preached with great power. At the height of his ministry he was in great demand as

a pastor and evangelist. He died in Suffolk, Virginia, in 1924.

MURDOCK WELLONS BUTLER.

Southampton County was the contributor of another minister to the Christian Church in the person of Murdock Wellons Butler from Johnson's Grove Church. He was educated at the Suffolk Collegiate Institute and ordained as an Elder in 1881. Among his earlier pastorates were Bethlehem, Waverly, Spring Hill and other churches of that area. Later, he served at Berkley, Raleigh, N. C., Henderson, N. C., Newport News, Conshohocken, Pa., and Muncie, Ind. He was serving the Wakefield charge at the time of his death in 1947, at the age of 87 years. He had a good personality, friendly disposition, and devout Christian spirit. He was refined in manner and chaste in speech. He was a good preacher, hard working pastor, loyal and faithful to his church and denomination.

WILLIAM THOMAS WALKER.

William Thomas Walker was from Caswell County, N. C., and spent only six years in this Conference. He was a great grandson of Rev. James O'Kelly and had some of his heroic spirit. He was the most colorful minister of this group and had elements of greatness that never came to full fruition. At the age of 17 he was a soldier in the Confederate army and was wounded at "Seven Pines" and lost an arm.

He was educated after the war at Graham Institute. He had a fine intellect, was a real student and became one of the strongest men in the North Carolina and Virginia Conference. He was licensed in 1867 and ordained in 1868. He first served Hines Chapel, Salem Chapel, and Mt. Bethel; and later, the churches of the Virginia Valley Conference until 1878. He then came to this Conference and served the Suffolk Church for four years and Berea (Nansemond) for six years. He also edited The Christian Sun for a part of this time. After returning to North Carolina he served New Providence, Shallow Well, and Burlington in the North Carolina and Virginia Conference; edited the North Carolina Prohibitionist, and was a candidate for governor on the prohibition ticket in 1888. "It was generally conceded that he made one of the strongest and most brilliant canvassers the state had known in many years." He was a man of strong personality, positive convictions, tough in debate and severe when antagonized. On the floor of this Conference at Liberty Spring in 1881, he faced an opponent represented by a prominent lawyer and defended himself in such forceful speech that an intelligent hearer said, he "would have done credit to any lawyer in the state." His last years were spent in declining health on his farm in Guilford County, N. C., where he died at the age of 51 in 1895.

MALCOLM L. HURLEY.

Malcolm L. Hurley was a native of Montgomery County, N. C., and was educated at Graham Institute. He served a number of churches in the North Carolina Conference and came to this Conference in 1882 and served Holy Neck, Liberty Spring, Berea (Nansemond) and organized and served Franklin. His health failed and he gave up the pastorate for some years, but was serving churches in the Western North Carolina Conference at the time of his death in 1907. He was a man of rare gifts. He had a "wonderful memory; fluent speech, manner and voice of an orator and a rare insight into human nature." He knew how to handle men and was a "money raiser." church builder and in his prime, an impelling speaker.

CHARLES J. JONES.

Dr. Charles J. Jones came to this Conference from Ohio in 1890 to foster a Mission in the City of Norfolk. Beginning with a mere "handful" he soon had a good congregation and a growing membership under the name of the Memorial Christian Temple. The church edifice, completed and dedicated in 1894, was the second largest and best in the Southern Convention. Previous to coming to Norfolk he conducted a revival in Suffolk for Dr. Staley, which has been considered the best ever held in that church. He always had the evangelistic urge and his sermons had the evangelistic appeal. In his early ministry he did hard service on our Western frontier working with such famous men as Peter Cartwright. Later, he served prominent churches in Ohio, Indiana, Pennsylvania, and Massachusetts. He edited the Herald of Gospel Liberty for eight years and at one time was a general evangelist.

Dr. Jones was of English extraction. His parents were simple, pious English folk, who, before they ever entered the bridal chamber in the simplicity of their souls, knelt and prayed and promised God that, if He ever gave them a son, he would be dedicated to Him for the Gospel ministry. Dr. Jones was the first born. He said that from earliest childhood he could never remember the day when he did not feel that he belonged to God and that he was born to be a minister. He had the most ministerial bearing I have ever seen. He looked every inch like a minister. When I first knew him he was just past middle life with greying hair and beard. He was tall, erect, standing over six feet and weighing over 200 pounds, with an impelling personality that made him outstanding in any group. His personality seemed a combination of nobility,

humility and spiritual effulgence. He was well educated and kept abreast with current thought. He was a student and excellent sermonizer. His pulpit utterances were, to me, the most inspiring and soul lifting I have ever heard. As a conversationalist, I have never seen his equal.

"He was a man. Take him for all and all, I shall not look upon his like again."

N. G. NEWMAN, Historian.

The report of the Committee on Evangelism was read and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE EVANGELISM.

In 1925—twenty-five years ago, this conference had a membership of 10,606 and a Sunday school enrollment of 7,446; benevolences for 1924 were \$96,604. In 1949 the conference membership was 11,311, a gain of 805; the Sunday school enrollment was 7,254—a loss of 192; the total benevolences was \$53,987—\$42,617 less than in 1924. (These financial figures for 1924 were compiled by the late Col. J. E. West.) Whatever these figures suggest to different minds it is evident that, as a conference, little progress has been made in numerical growth within the Sunday schools and churches. Many explanations may be offered, some good, some bad and indifferent. After all has been said, the fact is, we are growing too slowly.

The change in this alarming situation can be wrought through Evangelism. Webster defines evangelism: "To instruct in the gospel; to preach the gospel to; and to convert to Christianity." This definition applies to all forms of evangelism and covers a wider field than is usually included. This work cannot be done exclusively by committees and boards. There must be a spiritual dynamic and passion empowering

the ministers and laymen with the "power of God unto salvation."

We recommend:

1. That we recognize the Sunday school as the most practical agency in the primary enlistment of the unchurched and unsaved in our midst. Most of the members received by confession come into the church by the Sunday school. It is comparatively easy to secure new members of Sunday school classes. A crusade for enlistment in the Sunday school is a good beginning in the first steps of evangelism. The next step, in due time, should be enlistment in the membership of the church.

2. That our Missionary organizations seek to increase their efforts to win new members to the church, with special emphasis upon evangelism in the Young People's

Societies and the Vacation Bible Schools.

3. That our Sunday schools and churches emphasize attendance upon the worship services of the churches—in which there shall be a renewed emphasis upon evangelism, in proper balance with other departments of our church calendar.

4. That we designate a Week of Prayer during the year, in which there shall be an emphasis upon personal prayer, in private and in public, for a revival of religion

and a renewed spirit of evangelism.

5. That our conference set as a goal a net increase of 1,000 in our membership during the ensuing year. Respectfully submitted,

The report of the Committee on Foreign Missions was presented and, pending its adoption, an address was given by Miss Pattie Lee Coghill, Educational Secretary of the Southern Convention, using as her theme, "Becoming Missionary Conscious."

The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Since Jesus Christ uttered the Great Commission the Church has continued to preach foreign missions—"Christ for all and in all." Although the church has not done all it could nor should have done, it has been the spirit of Missions that has kept the church alive. Without missions there would be no church.

Our New Testament was written by missionaries. One of the earliest acts of the church was the sending out of missionaries to preach the Gospel. Our missionaries in China are withdrawing from the field because their work is being made ineffective by the Chinese Communists. For a long time the door to China was open, however, we did not enter with as much fervor and backing from Christians at home to sufficiently indoctrinate enough of the Chinese to keep Communism from dominating them.

Wherever opportunities present themselves to us today we ought to accept them with a firm faith that the Gospel offers more in terms of freedom, justice, and security than any other faith. This we must believe and support. Never was the Gospel more relevant to the needs of mankind than today. Faced with tyranny, hate, and fear, the Christian must speak his message of love, freedom and justice. Are we willing to make the sacrifices necessary to save the world through the preaching of the Gospel? If we fail to allow the spirit of Jesus to flow through our churches to meet the needs for freedom, justice and happiness for all people everywhere then we, as well as those we neglect, will suffer the consequences. We must more adequately present and support Our Christian World Mission.

On the mission fields we have only 384 missionaries with 100,000,000 people under our care for their Christian welfare. We are told that 50 more missionaries are urgently needed in 1951. Our contributions to foreign missions will help make

this need possible.

Never have so many needed our Christian love. Never has the need for foreign missions been so challenging and imperative as is true today.

Therefore, be it resolved:

That each church in the conference emphasibe the importance of Foreign Missions and support this enterprise of our Church by daily prayer and liberal contributions so that we may do our part in winning the world to Jesus Christ.

The report of the Committee on Home Missions was read and, pending its adoption, an address was given by Dr. W. T. Scott in which he cited the need of our stronger churches assisting the weaker ones. Attention was called to the action of The Christian Temple of Norfolk and their home mission outlook in their appropriation of \$1,250.00 each to Bay View and Second Church, Norfolk, to be used in their building programs.

The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF HOME MISSIONS COMMITTEE.

Your Committee met in regular session at Suffolk, Virginia, October 18, 1950, with Mills E. Godwin, Jr., S. T. Holland, M. E. Taylor and N. G. Newman present, and transacted the following business:

We recommend:

1. That \$400.00 be granted the Wakefield pastorate to be applied on pastor's salary.

 That \$700.00 be granted the Windsor Church on their Building Fund.
 That \$300.00 be paid the Ministerial Educational Fund on the Little Creek Church loan.

4. That the Trustees of the Conference be authorized to sell the Dendron Church Parsonage property in accordance with the desires of the three churches holding rights

in said property.

5. A resolution of the Christian Missionary Association in reference to starting a new work in the Providence area, Norfolk, County, has been referred to the Committee. We appreciate the interest of the Christian Missionary Association and the kind offer of cooperation, but we can make no recommendation because there are no funds available for any new project.

We highly appreciate the interest of the good people of the Wakefield Pastorate and their earnest efforts to carry on the work but our lack of funds make it impracticable for us to recommend their full request, and it is our hope and desire that the churches may be able to make up this difference of \$100.00, so there may be no

cut in the pastor's salary.

We highly commend the people of the Windsor Church for their earnest and devoted efforts in the building of their magnificent and much needed church plant. In consideration of the strenuous work they have done, their successful progress, and the heavy obligations assumed over a period of years, we deeply regret that, for lack of funds, we could not recommend the full amount requested.

WEDNESDAY—EVENING SESSION.

Conference was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by President R. E. Brittle, who, with the assistance of the Bethlehem choir, presented an inspiring worship service.

Memorial services in tribute to Rev. J. W. Warren, Dr. Luther B. Grice and Mr. W. E. MacClenny, were conducted by Dr I. W. Johnson.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS.

According to information which has been brought to the attention of your committee, the Conference has lost three former workers since the last session of this body. In token of our appreciation of their lives and service the following report is submitted for your consideration:

REV. J. H. WARREN.

Rev. J. H. Warren, a retired minister, passed away in January, 1950. Before uniting with the Eastern Virginia Conference he was a minister in the Methodist Church, in which he had served as pastor and District Superintendent, and had done some work as a Chatauqua Lecturer. He was pastor of the Ocean View Church before it was moved to Bay View and organized the Little Creek Church where he served as pastor until his retirement. He was a man of vision and enthusiasm, deeply interested in the church.

MR. WILBUR E. MACCLENNY.

Mr. Wilbur E. MacClenny was the official Historian of the conference for several years previous to his retirement due to failing health. He died on March 3, 1950, at the age of 74 years. He made some very valuable contributions to the recorded history of the Christian Church. Among his contributions were many papers written giving accurate historical information of the churches. His chief work in the historical field was his book—The Life of Rev. James O'Kelly—published several years ago. It was his great desire to revise that book and add some valuable information which he had secured since the book was published. He was a loyal member of his church and his historical records were sought far and wide. He left a great deal of historical material which should be edited and prepared for publication. His failing health made it impossible for him to finish that objective of his life.

REV. LUTHER B. GRICE.

Rev. Luther B. Grice, the beloved pastor of Holy Neck and Eure Churches, passed away on October 2, 1950, while a patient in the Kecoughatan Hospital, Hampton, Virginia. Dr. Grice came into our fellowship from the Baptist Church. In the Baptist denomination, he served as pastor of important churches in Chicago, Florida and North Carolina. His work in our church was limited to about two years, but during

that period he manifested a sincere interest in the denomination, and freely expressed his joy in the new found fellowship. Normally, he appeared to be a man of vigorous health, but in the midst of active service his health suddenly failed, and he lingered only a few weeks.

Looking back upon the lives of these co-workers of other days, we are moved to express our sincere appreciation of their contribution to the Kingdom of God through

our Conference. Therefore we offer the following brief resolutions of respect:

Resolved:

1. That we record our thanks to Almighty God for the gift of these men to our church; and for their labors in our conference.

That we record our appreciation of their friendly fellowship with us in the deliberations of this body, and in the local churches where they worshipped and served.
 That these resolutions be entered upon the records of the Conference, a copy

sent to *The Christian Sun* for publication a copy sent to the families of the deceased.

4. That the conference stand for a moment, in silence as a token of our prayers

of thanksgiving and sympathy.

Rev. Duane N. Vore, chairman of the Committee on Ministerial Education, presented Rev. Henry M. George as a candidate for conference ordination. The service was in charge of Rev. W. Millard Stevens. Dr. Roy C. Helfenstein gave the charge, Dr. N. G. Newman gave the prayer, Dr. I. W. Johnson presented the Bible, and Rev. Herbert G. Councill, Jr., gave the right hand of fellowship for the brethren.

The Conference Sermon was given by Dr. Douglas Horton, after which the Communion Service was conducted by Dr. Roy C. Helfenstein with the assistance of several laymen and ministers who served as deacons.

The conference adjourned after benediction by Rev. V. T. Crawford.

THURSDAY—MORNING SESSION.

Conference was called to order by the president at 9:30 a.m. Rev. Henry M. George led the opening hymn and Rev. H. E. Crutchfield led the session in prayer.

The minutes of the preceding day were read and approved..

Dr. W. T. Scott presented the following motion which was adopted.

That item 10 of the Southern Convention Report of Finance be interpreted to mean for the Eastern Virginia Conference that the Convention Office and Conference Treasurer prepare and present to the Conference session a list of church by church apportionment contributions received up to October 15th of each year and that the Secretary request the churches to report not later than October 15th.

On motion it was adopted that the secretary be requested to prepare a statistical chart of church letters and ministerial reports to be presented each year at the annual conference.

The report of the Committee on Stewardship was read and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP.

Stewardship means the great "unplowed field" in the average church and the "untried life" for the average individual in the church. Why so many churches continue their struggle for existence on the local level and plead inability to make substantial contributions to church extension with the vast resources of Christian Stewardship untapped remains the number one problem. The time was when the values of a well-

rounded stewardship program for local churches and average Christians was a vague issue. We had neither the understanding of the principles of Christian Stewardship, nor the materials for study to enlighten ourselves on the subject. Neither can be our excuse now. The examples of what a well-rounded program of stewardship can do for a local church are legion, and the individual practice of stewardship and tithing by individual Christians is bearing fruit in most every church. Ignorance of the law is no excuse in the eyes of the law. Certainly we cannot conscientiously say that we do know how to put Christian Stewardship to work in a local church, nor that we are not familiar with the spirit and principles of stewardship for our individual lives in the face of the abundance of materials available for the asking.

Many recommendations have been made by committees on stewardship in all our conferences, and in the Southern Convention. They have all been adopted without question and forgotten without exception. Why more? It would be hard to justify.

question and forgotten without exception. Why more? It would be hard to justify. Recommendations are not the answer. There must come a time of action before the response for consecrated men, women and dollars will be poured into local church needs and programs and find their way through local church concerns to the wider

needs of the Kingdom of God.

May it suffice to point out where effective stewardship programs must originate: Dr. C. H. Rowland used to say, "The pastor is the key man." He still is. Until and unless the pastor of the local church is willing to take the initiative no program can get very far. It means a lot of study on the subject. Some books must be read, some pamphlets must be bought and distributed. Some sermons must be preached, and some programs must be developed and put into the church life. Any pastor, of any church in the conference, who will bestir himself, can multiply the effectiveness of his church through a good, well balanced program of Christian Stewardship. Beyond these suggestions we would suggest the following means to this worthy end:

1. Put a literature table in the church vestibule and load it with all kinds of good

literature-it will pay its own way if well done.

2. Many good visual aid programs can be had for the asking. The Convention Office can help you. A free-will offering at the showing of any of the longer, better films will pay all expense and rich dividends in stewardship education.

3. Use the "Turnover Chart" in training workers for the Every-Member Canvass, in any church, rural or city. The entire program may be had by writing the Missions Council. Other methods are excellent. But here again, the pastor must lead off, perhaps, against some opposition.

Stewardship will work, but it must use your heart and hands. Your committee stands ready to assist individuals and churches at any time.

REPORT OF LAYMEN'S FELLOWSHIP.

A rally for the laymen of the Eastern Virginia Conference was held at the Suffolk Christian Church on Saturday, April 15, 1950, with about 125 men from our churches throughout the conference present. Mr. W. B. Williams of the Newport News Church presided and presented the program. Interesting discussions were held in the afternoon centering around the duties of the Deacons of our churches and the Finance Committees. Mr. Walter A. Graham, head of our National Laymen's Fellowship, spoke at the banquet and brought a very challenging message.

spoke at the banquet and brought a very challenging message.

There were quite a number of our laymen attending the Laymen's meeting for the Southern Convention at Elon College in January. It is generally felt, I think, that the men of our churches represent the great untapped reservoir of strength that is needed to help put across so many of the programs of our church that need new emphasis. It is to that end that the President has dedicated himself in the hope that the men of our churches will begin a real service to the Kingdom of God. The strength and ability is present if we can only channel it into the proper course.

The fall rally of the laymen for our churches in Eastern Virginia will be held on Sunday afternoon and evening, November 5, 1950 with our church in Franklin, Virginia.

The report of the Southern Convention was given by the president, Rev. W. Millard Stevens. He brought to the attention of the conference the need for dedication on the part of each church member in enlisting men, women and young people for Christ; sharing wholeheartedly in the progarm of Stewardship; and arising from our apathy to action.

The report was received with the request that its contents be printed in The Christian Sun.

The report of the Woman's Missionary Conference was read and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE EASTERN VIRGINIA WOMAN'S MISSIONARY CONFERENCE.

The Thirty-eighth annual session of the Eastern Virginia Woman's Conference of Congregational Christian Churches met at the Suffolk Church, Tuesday, October 3, 1950, with more than 415 women, ministers and visitors present. The theme for the day was "Thy Will To Do." This same theme is to be followed throughout the coming year.

The conference considered it a rare privilege to have two interesting and inspirational speakers to appear on the program. The keynote address of the day was given by Dr. Ruth I. Seabury, Missionary Education Secretary of the Missions Council of the American Board. She told the thrilling story of Christ and the Church in Japan. The President of our Woman's Missionary Convention, Mrs. O. H. Paris, brought us a wonderful message on "Thy Will To Do-With A Christ-like Spirit."

Mrs. W. B. Williams, our treasurer, reported the total financial receipts for the year amounted to \$8,878.37, with 38 women's societies, 31 young people's, 26 children's societies and 26 cradle roll societies reporting. The conference adopted a financial goal of \$10,000.00 for the coming year. It also voted that a committee be appointed to re-study the financial goals of our societies and recommend increases wherever possible. This is being done to help in the expansion of our work and the increasing need for funds for mission work.

Our Mission Study books are Assignment—Near East and Once There Were Two Churches. Our Bible Study is Great Bible Prayers. The Thank Offering will be used to pay for the renovating and redecorating of Whitley Memorial Auditorium at Elon

College.

Our installation service for the 1950-51 officers was very impressively conducted by Mrs. O. H. Paris, our Woman's Convention President. The officers installed were: President—Mrs. William T. Harrell; 1st Vice President and Superintendent of Friendly Service-Mrs. Garland Spratley; 2nd Vice-President-Mrs. Ray F. Gordon; Recording Secretary—Mrs. H. S. Hardcastle; Corresponding Secretary—Mrs. L. W. Stagg; Treasurer-Mrs. W. B. Williams

The report of the Committee on Social Action was read and, pending its adoption, an address was given by Rev. Wayne W. Womer, executive secretary of the Virginia Church Temperance Council.

The report was amended by the addition of an additional paragraph, (D). The report was then adopted as follows:

REORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL ACTION.

Your Committee for Social Action has no actual report of work accomplished to present. The reason for this is obvious-no work was undertaken. The committee has no reason for its failure but it can offer an excuse—there is apparently no organization in our local churches to foster or to sponsor such work. There is, therefore, no compulsion put upon the committee to attempt any work.

Perhaps it would not be amiss to point briefly at things we might have done.

1. We might have taken part in the Displaced Persons program sponsored by our national fellowship. Granting that our knowledge is limited, your committee knows of no church in our conference undertaking this highly commendable and greatly needed effort. Certainly, ministry to men who are in dire need should not find us so selfconcerned that we shut our ears and our hearts to their need. The "in as much as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, my brethren," certainly is pertinent in our day and would gain visual and personal expression through our sharing in the D. P. program. Our failure to participate should give us cause for serious reflection.

2. We might have shared in the Agricultural Relations program of the National Council for Social Action. The emphasis on the Family Farm and a Christian Policy for American Agriculture could present some interesting ideas to all of us, urban or rural. Certainly, we recognize the fact of personal Christian character evident in our membership but the discussion for a Christian program for Agriculture (or industrial relations or any other specific field) serves to deepen that personal character and is

never a reflection on it.

3. We might have done very constructive work in the area of International Relations. There may have been a few instances in local churches where such study was undertaken but no general study was developed. The church must take a place of leadership in the area of world politics if we are to have a reasonable peace. That leadership cannot begin at the national level, it must begin at the local church. Our education can and ought to begin in our own churches. It will not be easy nor will it always be tremendously effective, but it ought; it needs to be done if we are to be enabled to make a contribution to world peace. Intelligent understanding must begin in the church. These are three of the areas in which our churches could have and should have worked with the Council for Social Action in the past year. Your committee confesses its dereliction in failing to present any challenge to you that you might be called to action.

In the light of the failure of the past year, we make the following recommendations:

- A. That in every church where it has not already been done, a chairman for Social Action be elected and work begun to acquaint our people with the effort of the church in this area.
- B. That our churches participate in the national program of the Council on "The Churches and Alcohol Education" using the four-point program as adopted by the Council at its meeting in February 1950. That program is (pg. 107 Advance Reports of General Council, Etc.):
- (1) Abstinence is the rule of prudence. The results of the use of alcohol are not specifically predictable. However, it frequently intensifies other human problems, individual and social. Any individual's behavior may have a serious influence upon the moral character and conduct of another. Modern living requires exceptional skills which are frequently affected by the use of alcohol. A substantial proportion of those who start to drink become addicted to the use of alcohol beverages.
- (2) Any use of alcoholic beverages must respect such conditions as (a) there should be the intention of and capacity for avoiding drunkenness, (b) there should be no drinking before the assumption of responsibilities such as driving, using vocational skills or making important decisions, (c) there should be no drinking by minors nor should temptation be put in their way, (d) there should be no drinking that leads to dependence upon alcohol, and (e) no substantial part of a person's income can justifiably be spent for such a purpose.

(3) Voluntary drunkenness is wrong. The repudiation of individual moral re-

sponsibility in deliberately getting drunk is a sin against God. It is also a menace to the health and welfare of one's self and one's neighbors.

- (4) Alcoholics are sick persons and must be so treated. The resources of medicine, social sciences and religion should be used for their rehabilitation. In many areas far more adequate personnel and facilities are needed.
- C. That our churches secure the services of one of the secretaries in a series of discussion groups on the Christian Policy for American Agriculture. If possible, such a meeting or series of meetings should also be worked out in the fields of Industrial Relations and International Relations that the experience may be shared with the local churches.
- Dr. Ray Gbboins, Director of the Council for Social Action, closed his report with these words: "Believing that the church will find itself as it loses itself in the struggle to achieve a warless, just and brotherly world, we launch this venture, dedicating ourselves to unremitting work for a day in which all men find peace, security and abundant life."

D. That we make public our disapproval of the liquor advertisements appearing

in our local papers, magazines, on the radio and on Television.

Your committee feels that these words declare the need for our participation in the program of the Council for Social Action and request the churches to meet the challenge they offer that the task may be accomplished to the glory of God.

On motion it was adopted to refer our financial obligation to the Virginia Church Temperance Council to the Finance Committee for a report to the Executive Committee for action.

The report of the Committee on Superannuation was read by the chairman and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUPERANNUATION.

Your Committee on Superannuation has been rather inactive during the past year. However, recommendations have been made to the National Division of Ministerial Relief that two additional grants be made in the conference, bringing the total grants of the conference to five—the largest number in the past decade.

We believe that our ministers and the churches, in the greater majority, are taking advantage of the opportunities offered by the Annuity Fund. If there are ministers who are not covered by the Fund, we urge them to investigate the advantages it offers and urge their churches to see that it is made possible for them to become a member. The committee offers its assistance in bringing them into membership.

During the last few years the churches of the conference have been doing a good job on the Superannuation Apportionment, but while the Convention Apportionment was slightly oversubscribed the past year, the conference lacked by a few dollars raising its full apportionment. We hope that this will not be so for the present year, and we urge that it be fully met or oversubscribed in the coming year. We also recommend that our churches take a Christmas Fund offering.

THURSDAY-AFTERNOON SESSION.

The conference was convened at 1:30 p.m. The hymn was led by Rev. C. C. Thomas, who also gave the opening prayer.

The report of the Sunday School Convention was read and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

The eighty-first session of the Sunday School Convention of the Eastern Virginia Conference of Congregational Christian Churches met with the Cypress Chapel Christian Church, Cypress Chapel, Virginia, on Tuesday, July 18, 1950, with about 250 del-

egates and visitors in attendance.

The theme of the convention was "Consecrated Service Through the Sunday School." A very interesting program was presented around this theme, with Rev. Duane Vore, pastor of the Suffolk Christian Church, bringing the principal address on the theme of the day. The program was well balanced, and those participating brought very inspiring messages and discussions relative to our entire Sunday school program. Collections and reports were received from all except four or five of our Sunday schools in the conference. Those failing to send in reports are those that have been failing to do so for years.

The sum of \$800.00 was appropriated again for the Board of Christian Education, with \$100.00 earmarked for training schools within our conference. Again \$50.00 was ordered sent to the Virginia Council of Churches, and miscellaneous items of expense were ordered paid. There was also expressed again the feeling that Leadership Training Schools for our Sunday school workers were very necessary and worthwhile, as there is always present a great need for better instruction and preparation

in our work.

The ladies and all members of the Cypress Chapel Church did a wonderful job of entertaining the 1950 session of the convention, and it was voted to have the 1951 session meet with the South Norfolk Christian Church on Tuesday after the third Sunday in July, 1951.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Floyd A. Turner, president, Suffolk; Rev. H. E. Crutchfield, vice-president, Great Bridge; W. H. Baker,

secretary, Newport News, and Miss Mary Lee Folk, treasurer, Suffolk.

The report of the Pilgrim Fellowship was read by the secretary and adopted as follows:

REPORT ON PILGRIM FELLOWSHIP.

This has been a most progressive year for the young people of Eastern Virginia. There have been five new young people's groups organized this past year. We now have 33 active groups, which have met in three conference rallies. The spring rally was held at Holland, the summer rally at Suffolk (being a joint meeting of the Pilgrim Fellowship and the Young People's Missionary Conference), and the fall missionary rally at Suffolk, with Dr. Ruth I. Seabury as speaker. All of the rallies have been well attended, and a great deal of enthusiasm has been shown by the young people, their leaders and their ministers.

We have worked with the other conferences of the Southern Convention in sending a young person from our area to a work camp in Italy. Max Vestal will meet with us in the early spring and tell us of his experiences at the work camp. We also helped to send two delegates to the National Council of Pilgrim Fellowship held at Milwaukee Downer College, Milmaukee, Wisconsin. These delegates were Mrs. W. B. Williams

and Jack Byrd.

Miss Pattie Lee Coghill, Jack Byrd, and other interested people have met in district meetings in all three districts of our conference, discussing plans for the coming year. These meetings, we feel, have been very successful, and we believe they will be of help to the societies in the coming year.

The most important thing that has happened in our conference this year and in many years, took place at the joint meeting of the Pilgrim Fellowship and the Young People's Missionary Conference in Suffolk. There these two groups voted to become united under one set of officers, and that the name of the new organization be called "The Eastern Virginia Youth Fellowship. The apportionment dues of the local groups will be sent to the treasurer of the Woman's Missionary Conference. Two-thirds of this will be held by the treasurer for projects designated by the young people, and one-third will be turned over to the treasurer of the Youth Fellowship to be used in conference work.

This organization will hold three meetings each year. The first meeting will be the first Sunday in February, at the end of Youth Week; the second meeting in the early

summer and the fall meeting will be devoted to missionary work.

There will be a slate of officers similar to the one previously used by the Pilgrim Fellowship. In addition, there will be a young people's missionary superintendent, appointed by the Woman's Missionary Conference.

We believe that this is the most progressive move the Eastern Virginia young people have ever taken. We pray for strength and guidance in the tasks which lie

ahead.

The report of the Committee on Religious Literature was read and, pending its adoption, an address was given by Rev. Earl T. Farrell on "The Protestant Reformation."

The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

An informed leadership and an informed "followship" are both absolutely essential to the realization of constructive service and continuing progress in any church. Discriminating reading on the part of ministers and laity definitely contributes to the efficiency of both groups and to the work of the church in general.

Having a large number of books in one's library and a long list of current religious periodicals coming into one's home each week or each month, does not necessarily indicate one's interest in or use of religious literature. Merely to have religious literature at hand is not enough. The important consideration is not how many religious books and periodicals a person has; the important thing is how many he consistently reads; and, an even more important thing is how understandingly he reads what he reads—how well one digests and assimilates what he reads. Merely to pass words in review or uncomprehendingly to scan the lines of a printed page is not true reading. Reading is more than recognizing the words used by a writer; it is to recognize, appreciate and appropriate the facts presented by the writer. Reading is indeed one of the fine arts; and as such should be a major concern of every disciple of Jesus.

What people read and how well they read is reflected in what they think and in how they act. Reading the right kind of religious literature enables Christian people to "grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord"; and such people help their church to "Grow and Glow and Go." A reading membership is one of the best assets any church can have.

But all that is labeled "Religious Literature" is not of religious value. Much socalled religious literature is in fact but unrealistic shadow-boxing—distorted helftruths, echoes of demagoguery—the product of tangled or prejudiced minds.

The leaders in the various departments of our denominational life are best qualified to gove guidance in choosing the religious literature our people should read. So-called religious literature that is peddled from house to house by fanatical individuals who berate and malign the churches, is an abomination in the sight of the Lord, and should provoke righteous indignation, instead of receiving the patronage of all church-loving people.

Our Sunday schools, our missionary societies, our women's groups, our men's groups, our youth groups, and all other groups within our churches are urged to use our denominational literature. And we would urge that every Congregational Christian

Church home should be a proud subscriber of our two denominational publications— The Christian Sun and Advance.

The general topic, "Advance in the Southern Convention," was ably presented by Dr. William Moseley Brown, in regard to Elon College. Dr. L. E. Smith was absent, due to illness.

Supt. W. T. Scott spoke on "Advance through the Convention Office."

"Advance through Our Orphanage" was presented by Supt. John G. Truitt.

Dr. Robert Lee House, editor of *The Christian Sun*, gave the conference some ways by which our church paper can help us in our progress.

Dr. Ross Sanderson spoke to the conference on "Advance through Survey of Churches." Dr. Douglas Horton addressed the conference on the subject, "Advance in Our Christian World Missions."

Benediction and grace for the table by Dr. Horton, concluded the morning session.

WEDNESDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Following an opening hymn, Rev. L. M. Presnell led in prayer.

Matters of business were called for.

"Progress Needed in Our Local Churches," was discussed by the ministers of the conference, each telling what was the greatest need in his churches.

One delegate from each church was asked to tell what his church needed in order to advance, from the view-point of the laity of the church.

The chairmen of all conference committees were called to the platform and asked to state what their respective committees expected to present to conference for approval in order to advance as a conference.

The report of the Committee on the Ministry was presented by Rev. E. Carl Brady, chairman, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE MINISTRY.

1. Max Vestal is continuing his studies at Elon. This is his sophomore year. He wishes to continue as a member of the Biblical Class. The committee makes this recommendation to conference.

2. Rev. Thomas D. Sutton has completed his college work at Elon. We recommend that by action of this conference, the order of his ordination be changed from

local or conference to regular ordination.

3. Rev. Martin Fogleman has served a field in the Eastern North Carolina Conference for some time now, and he has been called back. He requests local ordination at this session of conference. Upon the recommendation of his churches, we recommend that this conference grant him local ordination.

4. Rev. Fred Allred is doing a fine and outstanding piece of work in our midst. His attitude has been very commendable. We recommend his ordination upon his completion of his college work in May. The time and place should be decided upon

by the Executive Committee and Brother Allred.

5. Winfred Bray appeared before the committee. He is attending Elon now, preparing to enter the ministry. We recommend that he be admitted to the Biblical

6. Rev. R. T. Grissom asks to be allowed to serve as pastor of Hank's Chapel Church while holding membership in the Eastern North Carolina Conference. We commend him for taking this position and recommend that he be allowed the privilege to do so.

7. Lunnie Burgess appeared before the committee and asked for conference

WEDNESDAY—EVENING SESSION.

Conference was called to order by President Lester. Rev. Fred Allred, host pastor, conducted the devotional service.

Following the devotional, Bill Simmons, president of Pilgrim Fellowship, presented the work of the young people.

Licensure and ordination of candidates recommended by the Committee on the Ministry. Mr. Lunnie Burgess was given conference license, and Rev. Martin L. Fogleman was given conference ordination.

The night service was concluded by sermon and communion conducted by Dr. Douglas Horton.

THURSDAY—MORNING SESSION.

Conference was called to order at 9:30 by President Lester. After singing a hymn, Rev. H. V. Cox led the prayer.

Minutes of the previous day were read and approved.

The report on Evangelism was presented by Rev. Clyde Fields, chairman, and was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM.

Many have come to the conclusion that we must evangelize or fossilize. Thirtyeight denominations with some 40 million members have been at work in the United Evangelistic Advance. This united effort comes to a close on December 31, 1950. Your committee has been working in our conference through this United Advance.

The conference was divided into three areas with a chairman of each area. Area rallies were held March 6-8 in each area. A team composed of Rev. Walter Hall, Rev. W. T. Madren, Rev. Clyde Fields, and Mr. Walter Lanier led these workshops on Evangelism. Area chairmen Ralph Riddle, J. C. Phillips and Mrs. I. L. McDowell led the area meetings and have been at work since with the ministers of the areas in interest of evangelism. From reports received, we feel that our conference has made much progress in our evangelistic endeavor. Some churches failed to attend the rallies and neelected to report to us.

the rallies and neglected to report to us.

Our denomination is projecting a Mid-Century Advance. It is impossible to advance without the evangelistic note. The fine art of winning men and women to Christ and to church membership is the aim of evangelism. The goal is sacred, not the method. Evangelism includes mass evangelism or revivals, personal witness, visitation evangelism, educational evangelism, pastors' classes, evangelism through worship, radio evangelism, and other methods. If we are to have a Mid-Century Advance

we must use all of these methods if possible, or as many as ministers and churches consider workable locally.

We, your Committee on Evangelism, suggest the following plan of evangelism during this Mid-Century Advance:

- 1. We suggest a community survey to ascertain how many people are within reach of each church. Too many times we take it for granted that we are reaching all the people.
- 2. We suggest that the survey findings be discussed by each local pastor and the official board or committee on evangelism. We recommend a plan for reaching all those shown by our survey to be unchurched, be born out of prayer and meditation. Knowing there are unchurched people near the church will not bring them in; we must go out for them.
- 3. We suggest the following plan as a guide for reaching those discovered by our survey:

(1) Sound the evangelistic note from every pulpit.

- (2) Call a meeting of all members of church concerned about the unchurched.
- (3) Conduct a class of instruction in evangelism. A large chart, "Two by Two," is helpful. Write to the Commission on Evangelism, 287 Fourth Avenue, New York 10, N. Y., for material.
- (4) Go out after the unchurched two by two, as Jesus sent out his disciples.
- (5) Take advantage of revivals annually, for two weeks if possible; emphasize evangelism at Christmas, Easter, Sunday evening services, in Sunday school, in youth groups, and in the Missionary society.

(6) Make an effort to get all who are converted to join our churches.

(7) Each church should endeavor to reach at least one member per month per 100 members, and each church and Sunday school should have promotion days.

Your committee feels that Christ is the answer to the chaos in our world. Our task is to make Christ known to all men.

The report on Sunday Schools was presented by S. H. Pell, and was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Sunday school is one of the most important organizations in our country today. Why?

Because in Protestantism it is the only place where religion can be taught. This makes the Sunday school the more important since we meet only once a week, and about thirty miutes is the limit of time allowed one to teach children religion. Let us take our Sunday School work more seriously. Let us make every minute count while we are in class. Think how long it would take us to finish high school if we had only 26 hours of work each year. It would take about 41 years to complete just one year. Think of that. Yet we are satisfied to do as we have been doing in the study of the all-important text book, the Bible. Let us give every possible moment we have in teaching the Bible to those who come to our Sunday schools.

The activities of our convention this year have been a religious institute for superintendents, teachers and Bible school workers. This was a new experince for us, but was very successful. The attendance was not as great as we expected. However, the work that was accomplished was most helpful to those who attended.

The Sunday school convention used as a theme, "The Sunday School Geared for Service." It met at Union Grove Church. The session was enjoyed by 184 people. The increase in convention attendance is an indication that our people are becoming more interested in Sunday school, not only at home but also in the schools throughout the conference.

We had seventeen schools to report and twenty-one actually represented at the convention. From reports, we find an increase of one per cent in both enrollment and average attendance.

The treasurer received \$191.40.

In the absence of the chairman, Mrs. F. C. Lester read the report on Religious Literature, which was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

Never before in the history of our nation has good reading and study been stressed as much as today. In our schools, our clubs, and our adult education groups, millions of dollars are being spent every year to review this literature. To cast aside the undesirable and replace the low standard text with materials that teach better morals and higher home standards as well as school standards, our adult education groups have asked publishers not to accept materials for print that lower religious and moral beliefs. The greatest time youth spends studying religious literature is in our churches. Are we meeting their needs by culling our materials? or do we still believe in the misconcepts of our eighteenth century forefathers, that seven is a holy number and to be greatly respected. When we see this in our literature and go to our Bibles to read and study, only to find someone has given us a wrong lead, does it cause some young person who has not spent time in prayerful study of the Bible to doubt that the Bible is the greatest of all books? Not a book on witchcraft. Are we causing our youth to have doubts where the Bible is concerned, just because we have fallen down on our presentation of it to the child?

The religious literature of our church is carefully written by our religious leaders; reviewed by others, and then published for us. So when you go home, sit down and read your Sunday school literature! Find out what our children are studying; cast aside literature of other denominations and non-denominational materials. order our materials, and be happy and content that our children, our greatest gift

from God, are safe in studying their Sunday school literature.

Then we can face God and hear, "Well done my faithful servant." Mrs. Jack Shoffner, MRS, FRED ALLEN, HOMER COCHRAN.

The report of the Committee on Christian Education was presented by the chairman, Mrs. F. C. Lester, and was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

The Executive Committee of the conference last fall voted to have on Committee on the Ministry and one on Christian Education, rather than the joint committee as heretofore. This, then, is the first report to conference on just "Christian Education."

The committee has had one joint session with the Committee on Religious Literature, since the work of the two is closely allied. Miss Pattie Lee Coghill acted as advisor, and an institute for children's teachers was planned.

Progress in the Mid-Century Advance in the field of Christian Education needs

to be made along these lines:

1. Support of Elon College through:

(a) Our gifts—apportionment, Sustaining Fund, personal;

(b) Our young people—no use to have an institution if we do not use it;

(c) Our words of good will—speak a good word for our college whenever possible, and the first two items will come easier.

2. Support of our Convention Board of Christian Education through: (a) Paying our apportionment—\$310 out of \$475 was paid last year;

(b) Attending leadership training schools planned by this board; (c) Taking advantage of the services of Miss Pattie Lee Coghill, educational secretary, part of whose salary comes from our payment of this fund.

3. Better training of our Sunday School Teachers, because:
(a) The teaching of the Christian religion is important enough to demand our best:

- (b) They must be able to stand up along side public school teachers and their methods, if Christian education is to be a vital influence in the lives of their pupils.
- 4. Better support of our Summer Conferences, Institutes, Training Schools, that,

(a) We will develop leaders in all age groups in our local churches;
(b) We will take advantage of all our opportunities offered to better inform ourselves in the field of Christian education.

5. Vacation Bible Schools available for the children of every church, using:

(a) Local church leaders:

(b) Joint leadership with other churches;(c) Student Summer Service leaders.

6. Use of our own Denominational Literature, because:

(a) It promotes our own denominational ideas;

(b) It is comparable to the best in public school literature;

(c) Its emphasis is upon church and home working together, so it fosters Christian education in the home.

We urge every church to work for these things during the coming year.

Mrs. F. C. Lester, C. FRED ALLRED, FLOSSIE BRAY, STACEY HAYES. R. S. MURRAY.

The report of the Committee on Home Missions was presented by Rev. John Q. Pugh, chairman, and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

Your committee met on July 18, to make plans for the work. During this period of work, it was decided to hold a joint meeting with the C. M. A. Executive Committee. Such a joint meeting was held on August 29, at Pleasant Ridge Church. Through discussion of the joint committee, plans were arranged for the joint committee of seven to visit the churches of the Western North Carolina Conference and get the value of the C. M. A. work before the people. This was done, with some response to the great need of our Home Mission work, but not what your committee had hoped to see.

Although we wish to commend each church that has responded to the call of this great need, we wish also to commend the following churches for improvements they have made:

Pleasant Ridge for the splendid work it has done this year in clearing its parsonage and garage of their indebtedness, and in making plans to build some new Sunday school rooms.

Needham's Grove for the Sunday school plant which they are building, which consists of five class rooms and a room to house a heating plant.

Hank's Chapel for their parsonage which is almost completed, ready for a fulltime pastor.

Pleasant Grove for renovating its interior and looking forward to building a new church building.

Pleasant Cross for the steps it has taken in setting up a building fund, looking forward to building a Sunday school plant.

Smithwood for purchasing a lot for their parsonage, looking forward to building soon.

Liberty for planning to build a parsonage.

Pleasant Hill for beautifying its interior by placing carpet on the entire church floor.

Seagrove for the splendid work it has done this year in clearing its parsonage of indebtedness, and voting not to ask aid from the Mission Board on pastor's salary.

There are some churches which we have not heard from which, perhaps, have

made some improvements; if so we wish to commend them, also.

In our survey, we find a large field of service to be rendered in the way of building new churches and improvement of existing churches. Siler City, for instance has no Congregational Christian church, but has memebrs of the Congregational Christian denomination living in the city.

Therefore, we, your committee, recommend the following:

1. That pastors and delegates of this conference go back to their local churches with a desire in their hearts to arouse the members of their churches to support the home mission cause.

2. That pastors and laymen become interested in building up a sustaining fund for this great need by securing members for the C. M. A. through the local church.

3. That pastors and delegates go back home to their local churches with a desire in their hearts to stress the need of paying their conference apportionments in full, that the things written in this report may be seen to come to pass.

4. That the Home Mission Board pay \$50.00 to Flint Hill (M.) on pastor's salary when the church has paid that amount; also that \$50.00 be paid to Bennett

Church when it too has paid \$50.00 on pastor's salary.

JOHN Q. PUGH, Chairman, ERNEST SCOTT, MRS. QUINTON HICKS, M. A. POLLARD.

NOTE.—An amendment to the report was adopted as follows:

5. That the conference go on record as favoring a survey, and if found advisable, to proceed to organize a new Congregational Christian church in Siler City, N. C. The Executive Committee and the Home Missions Committee are to be responsible for the survey and investigation, and for decision concerning beginning a new church in Siler City or elsewhere.

An offering was taken for this peticular situation in Siler City, amounting to \$130.00.

The report on Church Grouping was read by Rev. L. M. Presnell in the absence of the chairman, and was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH GROUPING.

This committee has not had a meeting during the year. One was planned, but the chairman was severely burned, and the meeting could not be held as scheduled.

One of the greatest needs of our conference is the grouping of our churches into pastorates, the locating of a parsonage in the group, and the calling of a minister to serve the group and give each church not only the preaching ministry but pastoral service. Our conference never can advance to the place where it should be in Christian service until we do this kind of thing. Before it can be done, we will need a cooperative spirit on the part of our churches, ministers and the committee on grouping.

Last year several pastorates were reported as having been recently formed. We are delighted to report that good news comes to us from the Pleasant Ridge-Spoon's Chapel-Union Grove pastorate and the Ether-Seagrove-Shady Grove pastorate as to the success of the grouping idea.

High Point has gone on full time service and has called Rev. G. H. Veazey as pastor. This leaves Sophia and Flint Hill (R.) in need of a third church to form a group. Perhaps Bailey's Grove, Pleasant Cross, Pleasant Union, or some other near by church will join this pastorate.

The one request for aid which has come to the committee this year was from Mt. Pleasant Church, which was anxious to join with some other nearby churches in a pastorate. Unfortunately, the committee did not succeed in helping. It may be there will need to be inter-conference planning in regard to grouping of churches in areas where the conferences overlap.

We believe in the worth of the idea of church grouping. We believe that there should be a committee at work in this field. We urge churches unable to support a

full-time pastor to seriously consider joining with other nearby churches in the formation of a pastorate.

PAUL WILSON, Chairman, A. L. DAVIS, CHARLIE KEY, W. R. LANIER, L. M. PRESNEIL, J. H. REGISTER, W. W. RITTER.

The report of the Committee on Ministerial and Church Relations was presented by Rev. Thomas D. Sutton. The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL AND CHURCH RELATIONS.

We, your committee, recommend the four recommendations which were made last year on Ministerial and Church Relations be continued for this coming year, which are as follows:

- 1. That no pastor follow the practice of visiting the members of a parish from which he has departed. When he does visit in a former pastorate, he should do so with the present pastor's full knowledge and approval.
- 2. That when a church asks for the services of a former pastor for special services, funerals, weddings, etc., the request be made through the present pastor if convenient, or with his knowledge and approval.
- 3. That pastors and churches be careful in carrying out all obligations, in both spiritual and business matters, so as not to bring reproach upon the church or ministry.
- 4. That local pastors and churches cooperate fully so far as it is possible in all efforts, enterprises and programs of the conference and of the Southern Convention.

And we would like to add one more recommendation to these four. It is as follows:

5. That the churches and pastors plan together on all new business and new plans for the church.

GEO. T. GUNTER, Chairman, T. D. SUTTON, C. B. BREWER, MRS. B. D. HARGIS.

Laymen's Work was presented by S. H. Pell, chairman, and adopted as follows:

REPORT ON LAYMEN'S WORK.

Never before in the history of our church, or of the world for that matter, has there been such a need for Christian laymen. Everywhere we turn, we need men to do this or that in order to promote God's Kingdom. We used to think that everything was to be done by the preacher, but all of us know today that it is too big a job for one person.

We, as laymen, must heed the call and lend a hand in God's work. The laymen's organization is growing every day, not only in the Western North Carolina Conference, but throughout the United States. Miss Helen Kenyon, as moderator of the General Council, reported: That more men showed an interest in church work during the past two years than in many years past; and that her most thrilling experience was the sight of young men in newer communities helping to build new churches.

I wish I knew how many laymen's groups we have in this conference. We have one group made up of three churches of our denomination, and a few from two neighboring churches, which meets once a month. Perhaps this could be a pattern for some of our smaller churches to follow, who feel that they do not have enough men in their church for a group by themselves.

We had one meeting this year, held jointly with the other conferences of the Southern Convention at Elon College. Some 600 laymen attended this meeting. Here,

we elected Mr. Geo. T. Gunter as our chairman for the ensuing year. Let's back him with our prayers and our cooperation, for a successful year in 1951.

S. H. PELL, Chairman.

The report on Women's Work was presented by Mrs. J. D. Gantt, in the absence of the chairman, and was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA WOMAN'S CONFERENCE.

During the past year, the women of our churches in North Carolina have united in the study of the Gospel of John, our missionary work in Japan, and how different denominations cooperate in our home land. Our giving amounted to \$9,120.97, of which \$1,656.59 was our Thankoffering which was given for equipment for the Han Mei School in Shaowu, China, and \$490 was given for life memberships and memorials, which fund is being used to educate Timothy Chang of Shaowu, China, at Duke Divinity School.

The family institute and the school of missions, both held at Elon College, were

well attended by women from this conference.

At the North Carolina Woman's Missionary Conference, held at the Liberty Vance Congregational Christian Church, near Henderson, in October, the societies from this conference were well represented. Three were recognized as superior societies—Sanford, Albemarle and Asheboro. Among the churches of the Western North Carolina Conference we have 22 missionary societies, fifteen in the Asheboro district and seven in the Sanford district. During the past year three new societies for women were organized—Pleasant Cross, Sophia and Union Grove—in the Asheboro district.

Our theme for the coming year is "Thy Will to Do." We will study "The Super-

iority of the Christian Religion," as found in the Book of Hebrews; missionary work in the Near East, and "Toward a Christian Community."

Our Thankoffering will be used to pay for the repairing and renovating of the

Whitley Memorial Auditorium at Elon College.

As our theme, "Thy Will to Do," suggests, we as Women of the North Carolina Woman's Conference are anxious to let the mind of the Master be the master of our minds, and then go out this year and do his will. Respectfully submitted,

The report of the Committee on Moral Reform was presented by the chairman, Mrs. B. P. Moffitt, and was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM.

Jesus said to his disciples, "Ye are the light of the world," and "Let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works and glorify your Father . . . "

We believe that these words are directed at the church today just as to that

small group nearly two thousand years ago.

We also believe that the lay- men and women of the church are no more free to hide their lights under a bushel than are the ministers and teachers. Teaching and preaching by words alone are not enough: our lives must show forth light, or our words are as "salt without savour."

With this belief in the teachings of Christ, we, your committee, recommend:

1. That we, individually and as a group, keep ourselves constantly reminded of our obligation to our fellowmen, to ourselves and to God.

That we pray much for needed wisdom, courage and strength to do our share

of the work of the Kingdom.

3. That we continue to cooperate with any and all groups which are striving to

bring about a truly higher standard of living.

4. That we be ever alert to the spiritual needs of the world, and quick to seize any opportunity to serve more fully in filling these needs.

MRS. B. P. MOFFITT, Chairman, B. H. LOWDERMILK, THOMAS B. LOWE, W. C. THOMAS,

The report of the Committee on Foreign Missions was read by Rev. W. Walter Hall, in the absence of the chairman, and was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Present world conditions make Foreign Missions difficult and exciting. Most of our missionaries have left or will soon leave China, where we have done an important service since 1830. The Philippine Islands are in the midst of upheaval. India is just assuming responsibility for its own government and is becoming conscious of its own nationality. So with other parts of the world in which we have sought to establish the Christian Church.

This may be the time for the church to really move forward in its missionary program. People are everywhere trying to discover new life, new ways of doing things. This gives the church an opportunity to present Christian ideals.

Your committee would suggest two ways in which we of this conference may advance:

- 1. In Education. We need to know what is happening in our mission field. Why are the missionaries leaving China? What will be left to represent our years of service there? What are the problems we face in West Africa, South and East Africa? How can we keep contact with Christians in Czechoslovakia and Spain? What is the American Board doing at this time and what are its plans for the future? Why are our missionaries returning home in larger numbers than they are going to the fields? These are questions that need to be answered in the minds of all our church members. This calls for a forward movement in Missionary Education.
- 2. Increased Giving. A year ago the American Board reported a deficit of \$110,000.00. During that year, eleven of our thirty-eight churches gave nothing for our Foreign Missionary enterprise. The remaining twenty-seven gave \$1,324.00. The churches reported 4,128 church members and 3,202 Sunday school members. This means that approximately 5,000 people were available to give for Foreign Missions, and that on the average they contributed 25c per year, or one-half cent per week. These figures indicate that in our conference we need to move forward in contributing for the world-wide program of the church.

Your committee suggests that during the coming year we seek to have missionaries speak in our churches; get our people to reading The Christian Sun and The Missionary Herald, as well as missionary books and pamphlets. We further suggest that each church plan for larger giving to the Foreign Missionary enterprise.

A motion was adopted to meet thirty minutes earlier for the afternoon session so as to give the C. M. A. more time for its meeting.

As a devotional service Dr. Douglas Horton spoke on "The General Council," closing with prayer and grace for the table.

THURSDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference was called to order at 1:15. Rev. B. H. Lowdermilk led the prayer.

The C. M. A. was then given time for its meeting:

MEETING OF THE CHRISTIAN MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION.

The Christian Missionary Association met on recess of conference. Vice-President W. W. Hall called the meeting to order. Minutes were read and approved.

The former treasurer, E. Carl Brady, reported that he had a balance of \$69.95

on hand which had not been turned over to the new treasurer, Jack Shoffner.

Due to the absence of the treasurer, the association was unable to ascertain the amount in the treasury.

W. H. Freeman made a motion that the dues of men, women and organizations be \$5.00, and that those of children be \$2.00. The motion was discussed and carried.

Motion made and carried that the officers of the C. M. A. work with the Home Mission and Executive Committees of the conference looking toward the organization of a church in Siler City or any other community.

Promises already made to Sophia and Flint Hill (R) churches were referred to the Executive Committee for disposition.

Motion made and carried that the present officers be re-elected for another year. The officers are as follows: Rev. M. A. Pollard, president; Rev. W. W. Hall, vice-president; Rev. E. Carl Brady, secretary, and Jack Shoffner, treasurer.

The C. M. A. adjourned until the next session of the annual conference.

At the conclusion of the C. M. A. meeting, the conference was again called into session by President Lester.

The report of the Executive Committee was presented by Rev. M. A. Pollard, and was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Meetings of the Executive Committee of the Western North Carolina Conference were held on November 21, 1949, August 14, 1950, and September 14, 1950. Business transacted by the committee included:

- 1. Separation of the Committee on Education and the Ministry into two committees, namely, "Committee on the Ministry" and "Committee on Christian Education."
- 2. To allow any committee of conference to receive up to \$5.00 on expenses connected with committee work.
- 3. Payment of Long and Long, lawyers, for the remainder due them in connection with the Pleasant Cross court case.
- 4. Approved the Elon College Sustaining Fund Committee as set up by the Southern Convention, and authorized it to work under suggested program.
- 5. Granted a letter of transfer to Rev. C. C. Thomas to the Eastern Virginia Conference of Congregational Christian Churches.
- 6. Consideration of the Big Oak situation, which finally resulted in the following agreement signed by the Executive Committee of this conference, the Executive Committee of the Eastern North Carolina Conference, and Revs. George M. Tally, R. Eugene Tally, and W. C. Farrell. The matter was settled through a consent judgment, which is on record in Moore County Court House at Carthage, N. C.

7. That it be recommended to conference that the official name of the conference be changed from the "Western North Carolina Christian Conference" to the "Western

North Carolina Conference of Congregational Christian Churches."

"THE PLAN OF RECONCILIATION."

We subscribe to the Five Cardinal Principles of the Christian Church—(1) The Lord Jesus Christ is the only Head of the Church; (2) Christian is a sufficient name for the Church; (3) The Holy Bible is a sufficient rule of faith and practice; (4) Christian Character is a sufficient test of fellowship, and of church membership; (5) The right of private judgment and the liberty of conscience is a right and a privilege that should be accorded to and exercised by all.

We believe the condition existing between Brothers George M. Talley, R. Eugent Tally and W. C. Farrell, and brethren within the Congregational Christian fellowship and conference grieves our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, and through the resulting disunity brings sorrow and reflection upon the Church which we love.

We believe Christian brethren who love the Lord and his Church ought to find in the Cardinal Principles of our Church a basis of Christian understanding and co-

operation which can exceed the habits of a sinful and warring world.

On the part of the Executive Committee of the Eastern North Carolina Conference, they agree to seek to bring about reconciliation and fellowship between Brothers Tally and Farrell and the brethren of the conferences by offering, with the consent of the Executive Committee of the Western North Carolina Conference, to recommend to the Committee on the Ministry and through it to the Eastern North Carolina Conference that it recognize the Christian Church ordination of Brother George M. Tally and receive him into full standing of the Eastern North Carolina Conference at its 1950 session; that the former Western North Carolina Conference licensures of Brothers R. Eugen Tally and W. C. Farrell be recognized and that they be given conference ordination by the Eastern North Carolina Conferenceat its 1950 session and be received into its fellowship.

On the part of George M. Tally, R. Eugene Tally and W. C. Farrell, they agree to be governed by the Principles and Government of the Eastern North Carolina Conference and the Southern Convention, and to work in the spirit of Christian brotherhood for the growth and prosperity of the cause of Jesus Christ, our Lord, through the Congregational Christian churches, boards, institutions and agencies of the church. Where and when they do not understand the spirit and work of the conference institutions and their brethren, they will in brotherly conferences seek to understand and cooperate. They will further seek to arrange conferences between officers of the churches served by them and the officers of the conference of which the particular

church is a member, that full understanding and cooperation may result.

On the part of the Eastern North Carolina Conference, they will encourage forgiveness and charity where there may be feeling of wrong done. We acknowledge that all of us stand in the need of forgiveness from our Lord, whose forgiveness and spirit can make us what we ought to be.

On its part, the Eastern North Carolina Conference will request the Western North Carolina Conference to recognize these brethren as pastors in churches they

serve in the Western North Carolina Conference.

In love, charity and forgiveness, we subscribe to these principles of reconciliation, and pledge ourselves through the help of Christ, our Savious, to give us strength to fulfill the spirit of these agreements.

The Elon College Sustaining Fund was presented by Rev. Clyde Fields, committee chairman, as follows:

REPORT ON ELON COLLEGE SUSTAINING FUND.

Our world has become more and more educationally conscious. More young people are seeking higher education than ever before, due to the demand for college-trained persons in positions of importance. Colleges must increase in efficiency if they are to meet the challenge before them. State owned institutions are building new buildings, increasing the faculty in numbers and in salary, and offering a varied curriculum to meet student requests for specialized courses. The citizens of the state are taxed to meet the cost of this expansion. Tax money is used to keep the tuition low. As is true in other "pies" the state or federal governments have their hands in, it is also true in education. Because of this, the teaching of the Bible and religious courses is ignored or held to a minimum.

Our Southern Convention owns a college, Elon College. It is ours to cherish, to pray for and to support. We want our college to meet the challenge for more and better education on the part of the youth of our churches. Our college needs new buildings, has increased its faculty's salary and numbers, offers a varied curriculum, which makes it a member of the standard college in rank. Credits from Elon are recognized anywhere. Our college also offers tuition as low as possible. In fact, the tuition only pays a small part of the cost to the college for a student for a semester. At Elon, we feel that education is only partially complete without a knowledge of the Bible and Christian living. We do not have any state or federal limitations on teaching the Word of God. Each student must take one year of Bible before receiving a college degree at Elon.

At the recent meeting of the Southern Convention, it was voted to set up the Elon College Sustaining Fund to help Elon to meet the challenge of the day. The plan is to give each member of our churches an opportunity to invest a dollar or more in our college. Conference committees are set up in each conference to help to get the matter before the people. The undersigned is a member of our own Western Conference Elon Sustaining Fund Committee. Each pastor has material describing the need and information concerning the work of our college. We are asking that

you read the folder given you, decide if the cause is worthy of your support, then take the envelope given you and place a gift in it for the college. Turn it in to your local church treasurer, so that your church gets credit for its help.

Let us take this matter seriously. Let us invest some of our money in giving to the youth of our conference the privilege of securing a college education with the Christian emphasis.

Rev. W. J. Andes presented the printed program as the report of the Program Committee. It was moved and carried that the printed program be adopted as the order of this session subject to such changes as conference may find it necessary to make.

The report of the Executive Committee was presented as follows:

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

We, your Executive Committee, approved the payment of \$25 to Dr. H. Shelton Smith for addresses given at the last session of conference.

We voted to pay the expenses of the Committee on Evangelism for the "Flying

Squadron Evangelism Institutes."

We nominated Rev. H. E. Robinson to fill the unexpired term of Rev. J. L. Neese on the Executive Board of the Southern Convention. Mr. Robinson was elected to the

Executive Board. Mr. Neese resigned because of ill-health.

We approved the Elon College Sustaining Fund, and the following committee was appointed to represent our conference: J. H. Rountree, W. J. Andes, Mrs. M. W. Andes, Mrs. W. E. Wisseman, H. E. Robinson, John Robert Walker, Clyde L. Walker, M. T. Sorrell, T. F. Bowers, T. G. Humphries, S. C. Harrell, G. D. Colclough, C. W. Gordon, Mrs. O. H. Paris.

We, on the recommendation of the Committee on the Ministry, approved the full ordination of Carl Wallace and James R. Hailey, and the Conference Ordination of John Lackey. The service of ordination took place on July 23, 1950, at the Palm

Street Church, Greensboro.

Rev. Carl Wallace was granted a letter of transfer to the Eastern North Carolina

Conference on September 22, 1950.

We approved and recommended the election of the following delegates to represent the North Carolina and Virginia Conference in the sessions of the General Council of Congregational Christian Churches held at Cleveland, Ohio, June 22 to 26, 1950: M. W. Andes, Horace Lee, P. H. Ricketts, H. E. Robinson, W. W. Sloan, J. Robert Walker, W. E. Wisseman, R. T. Woodruff, Jr., T. F. Bowers, S. C. Harrell. This action was taken on May 25, 1950.

We approved the request of the Conference Missionary Association for \$300.00 from our Conference Fund and authorized our Conference Treasurer to forward a check for the same to the treasurer of the C. M. A., so that the new needs of building and assistance to churches could be met. This action was taken on November 6, 1950.

We authorized our Conference Treasurer to send a check for \$25 to Dr. C. E. Newman, who had returned the check for \$50 sent him by the last conference.

We recommend that the charter of the conference be changed so that the name of the conference will be the North Carolina and Virginia Conference of Congregational Christian Churches.

The Congregational Christian Church of Lynchburg, Virginia, has become discouraged about the prospects for its development and dissatisfied over its denominational relationships. A majority of the membership of the church voted to become a Methodist Church. They appealed to the president of the conference to bring their request to the attention of the Executive Committee of the conference, and asked the Executive Committee to approve the transfer of the church, together with the church property to the Methodist connection, stating that the Methodist Conference had agreed to reimburse the Mission Board of the Southern Convention for its investment in the Lynchburg Church.

Supt. Scott, Dr. F. C. Lester, as chairman of the Mission Board, and the president of the conference met with a committee favoring the proposed transfer. It was agreed that a poll be taken of the entire membership relative to the proposal. It has been

reported that 78 ballots were returned: 68 voting for the proposal and 10 voting for the continuance of the church as a member of this conference.

The Mission Board considered this proposal in its session at Suffolk, Virginia, on October 25, 1950, and voted: That the Mission Board go on record as favoring the continuance of the church in Lynchburg as a Congregational Christian Church. Voted: That a committee consisting of Drs. Scott, Lester and S. C. Harrell, be appointed to represent the interests of the Board and Denomination in Lynchburg and that they be empowered to secure legal advice when and if needed.

We, the Executive Committee of this conference, recommend that this conference concur in and support the position of the minority of the Lynchburg Church and take such steps as may be necessary to protect the conference interests in Lynchburg.

The following is a certified copy of Resolution of Executive Committee of North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference:

This is to certify that on this the 30th day of October, 1950, a meeting of the Executive Committee of the above named conference was held at Elon College, North Carolina, with all of the members of the committee present, to-wit, Dr. Stanley C. Harrell, Rev. Thurman Bowers and Rev. W. J. Andes.

The following resolution was introduced by Rev. Thurman Bowers, was duly seconded and was unanimously passed, to-wit:

RESOLVED, That the committee hereby authorizes and approves the borrowing of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars by Palm Street Christian Church of Greensboro, North Carolina, in order for it to pay certain obligations incurred in erection of new buildings, and as Gate City Savings and Loan Association has agreed to lend said sum upon note secured by conveyance or deed of trust upon certain property of the church hereinafter described; Resolved, Further, That the officers of the North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference, to-wit, Dr. Stanley C. Harrell, president, and Rev. W. J. Andes, secretary, be and are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to execute note for Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, payable in monthly installments in such amount as may be agreeable to said association, and to execute and deliver deed of trust to Norman A. Boren, Trustee, conveying as security to such note the following described lots owned by this conference and used by said Palm Street Christian Church, to-wit:

All of Lots Nos, Ten, Eleven and Nineteen (10, 11 and 19) in the W. D. McAdoo Subdivision near Revolution and White Oak Mills in the city of Greensboro, N. C., said lots being shown on plat recorded in Plat Book 2, at page 64, office of Register of Deeds of Guilford County, N. C., and described in deeds recorded in Book 172, at pages 121 and 122, and Book 1249, at page 278, said Register's office;

And said officers and members of the Palm Street Christian Church are authorized to execute note and deed of trust in such form as said association shall require, and said association is authorized to make check payable for the proceeds of said loan to Mack Fulk, treasurer of Building Fund, Palm Street Christian Church, and deliver such check to him; and said officers and members are further authorized and empowered to do any and everything necessary to consummate said loan.

The report of the Committee on the Ministry was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE MINISTRY.

We, your Committee on the Ministry, feel that our churches and pastors should seek by all proper means to exalt the work of the ministry; and pray earnestly that the Lord may call from their best young men, worthy preachers of the Gospel.

We offer the following recommendations relative to ministerial personnel:

- 1. Rev. Carl Wallace graduated from Elon College at the last commencement. The churches of which he was pastor recommended him and requested that he be ordained. After due examination, it was recommended to the Executive Committee that he be ordained. Brother Wallace was approved for ordination by the Executive Committee and was ordained at Palm Street Church, Greensboro, N. C., July 25, 1950.
- 2. Rev. James Hailey graduated from Elon College at the last commencement. After due examination, it was recommended to the Executive Committee that Brother Hailey be ordained. Brother Hailey was approved for ordination by the Executive Committee and was ordained at Palm Street Church, Greensboro, N. C., July 25, 1950.
- 3. Rev. John R. Lackey graduated from Elon College at the last commencement. The church of which he was pastor recommended him and requested that he be ordained. Afte due examination it was recommended to the Executive Committee that he be given a conference ordination based on the following conditions:
 - (1) That he begin his seminary training this fall (1950).
 - (2) That he move to Elon College, so that he will be nearer his work, and that his wife pursue her training at Elon.

Brother Lackey was approved for conference ordination by the Executive Committee and was so ordained at Palm Street Church, Greensboro, N. C., July 25, 1950.

4. Rev. Percy Ricketts, who was given conference ordination at the last session of conference, is now serving as pastor of Mt. Bethel, New Lebanon, Kallam's Grove, and a non-denominational church near Danville. He reports progress in all of these churches. After due examination, we recommend that Brother Rickett's conference standing, that of conference ordination, be continued.

- 5. Brother Mullen C. Moricle, Jr., will be a sophomore when he returns to school at Elon College and is a member of the Biblical class. After due examination we recommend that he be continued as a member of the Biblical class.
- 6. Rev. Grady Julius Rice comes to us as a licentiate from the Georgia Congregational Christian Conference. He is a junior at Elon College and is serving as pastor at Hines Chapel and Monticello churches. He has presented a letter of transfer of his ministerial standing from the Georgia Conference to this conference. We recommend that he be received and enrolled as a licentiate in this conference.
- 7. Rev. William Rich is a student at Duke Divinity School and pastor of Damascus Church (E. N. C. Conference). Brother Rich is a licentiate in this conference and asks that he be considered for ordination. After due examination, we recommend that his standing as licentiate be continued and that he continue his studies at Duke and his church work and that he apply again for ordination next fall.
- 8. Brother Rosser Lee Clapp, a member of Apple's Chapel Church and enrolled in the Biblical class of this conference, requests that he be licensed at this conference session. After due examination, we recommend to the Executive Committee that he be licensed at this session of conference on the condition that he be examined before Dr. Scott and one or more members of this committee on the Principles and Policies of our church, and that he satisfy the examining committee as to his knowledge of this particular part of our church's work.
- 9. Brother Alfred Warren Matthews, a member of the First Church of Greensboro and a junior at Elon College, has been recommended for licensure by the Board of Deacons of his home church. After due examination, we recommend to the Executive Committee that he be licensed at this session of conference on the condition that he be examined before Dr. Scott and one or more members of this committee on the Principles and Policies of our church and that he satisfy this examining committee as to his knowledge of this particular part of our church's work. We also recommend that he be granted a \$100 work scholarship or other scholarships.
- 10. Rev. I. T. Underwood. We recommend that he be continued as a licentiate for another year.
- 11. Rev. Bland Leebrick, a licentiate of this conference, is a senior at Elon College, pastor of Carolina Church and serving as supply pastor of Berea Church. We recommend that his licensure be continued.
- 12. Rev. William T. Scott, Jr. is a licentiate in this conference and a student at Yale Divinity School. We recommend that his licensure be continued.
- 13. Rev. Howard P. Bozarth, pastor of Elon College Community Church, has presented a letter of transfer of his ministerial standing in the Suffolk South Association of Congregational Ministers to this conference. We recommend that he be received and enrolled as an Elder in this conference.
- 14. Rev. Carl Wallace has been granted a letter of transfer of his ministerial standing from this conference to the Eastern North Carolina Congregational Christian Conference by action of this committee. This letter was granted September 22, 1950.
- 15. Rev. Earl Farrell has accepted a charge in the Eastern Virginia Congregational Christian Conference and requests a letter of transfer of his ministerial standing to that conference. We recommend that this letter be granted from this conference to the Eastern Virginia Congregational Christian Conference.
- 16. Rev. Frank W. Murtfeldt requests a letter of transfer of his ministerial standing from this conference to the Hudson River Association in New York. Rev. Murtfeldt plans to do supply pastoral work in the New York State Conference. We recommend that this letter of transfer be granted.
- 17. Rev. Jesse H. Dollar has accepted the Liberty Spring pastorate in the Eastern Virginia Congregational Christian Conference. He requests a letter of transfer of his ministerial standing. We recommend that this letter of transfer be granted from this conference to the Eastern Virginia Congregational Christian Conference.
- 18. Brother Staley Sorrell, a member of the Biblical class, is now a student in the sophomore class at Averett College. It is recommended that he be continued as a member of the Biblical class.
- 19. Rev. Guy H. Veazey has accepted the High Point Church in the Western North Carolina Conference. He requests a letter of transfer of his ministerial stand-

ing. We recommend that this letter of transfer be granted from this conference to the Western North Carolina Conference.

- 20. Rev. H. E. Crutchfield has accepted the Berea Church in the Eastern Virginia Conference. He requests a letter of transfer of his ministerial standing. We recommend that this letter of transfer be granted from this conference to the Eastern Virginia Conference.
- 21. Rev. H. E. Robinson has accepted the Burlington Church and presents his letter of transfer from the Windham Association of Connecticut. We recommend his membership to this conference.
- 22. Lester Stanley of the Gibsonville Church has been recommended by his church for licensure. After due examination, we recommend that he receive local conference licensure.

We would urge your financial support of Foreign Missions. We have young people ready and waiting to go, but there is no money to send them. We have wide-open fields waiting for new missionaries. See that your church gives more than its conference apportionment for Foreign Missions.

We recommend the support of our young people as they seek to underwrite the expenses of bringing a student to this country for graduate study in Religion.

We especially urge your prayers for the safety of the Jacksons on their return to the United States.

Our Christian World Mission is upon us, more than ever. Last year we gave a little more than half of our goal. This year we must do more.

all apportionments to make an earnest effort to do so. Churches which have not paid in full their apportionment as of this date still have time to send their payments to the Southern Convention Office, and they would be given credit on the 1949-50 Conference Year.

We wish to commend the large number of churches which now follow the practice of sending payment of apportionments monthly or quarterly. We urge all of our churches to follow this practice rather than waiting until the end of the year.

At the last session of the Southern Convention, our conference, along with the other conferences of the Convention, was asked to make a small increase in apportionment to the Convention Fund and to add an item to make possible the printing of

The Christian Sun without a deficit.

The Convention Fund makes possible the friendly counsel and assistance to churches and leaders; the promotion of missionary interests, development of Sunday schools, young people's work, women's work, laymen's work, etc. It makes possible the Convention Office which provides the very core and hub of our organizational togetherness. It provides the salaries of the full time Superintendent, Educational Secretary, the bookkeeper and stenographer; and the maintainance of a central head-quarters for the Convention, the five conferences and the boards and institutions.

The Southern Convention, at its 1950 session, by resolution, requested that in addition to the regular apportionment for Elon College the conferences and churches engage in an effort to raise a minimum of \$1.00 per member annually for Elon College. Money given to this cause is to be known as the Sustaining Fund. For more than sixty years Elon College has served the people of the Christian Church, and we earnestly urge that our people do their best in their effort to reach the goal asked for in the resolution passed at the meeting of the 1950 session of the Southern Convention.

The report of the Committee on Christian Education was presented as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

1. The Young People of our Conference-

Under the leadership of Miss Dorothy Ballinger as president, the work of the young people of our conference has gone steadily forward. Two good rallies were held. The first was held in Burlington in April, when the emphasis was placed on sending a young person to a work camp overseas. Gifts for this purpose were dedicated at the rally. On October 15, another rally was held at our Happy Home Church. Max Vestal reported on his experience in the work camp in Europe, and representatives from all the summer camps and conferences made reports. New officers were elected at this rally. Bill Tolley of Lynchburg, a senior at Elon College, is the new president. Rev. and Mrs. Mark Andes and Rev. Henry Robinson are the counselors.

2. The North Carolina and Virginia Sunday School Convention-

The annual session of the Sunday School Convention was held on July 13, at our Danville Church. It was a good meeting with good reports. Mr. Algie Blalock of Union Ridge was reelected president. One aim, according to Mr. Blalock is to get all of our Sunday schools to use Pilgrim Press literature. He feels that training schools and institutes can be more helpful if all Sunday schools are using the same literature.

3. Leadership Training Schools-

Your committee reports with pleasure the successful training school held last January in Burlington for leaders of our Sunday schools in the Burlington area. Much of the success of the school was due to the wonderful manner in which the churches cooperated. They are planning a similar school for 1951. Taking the cue from Burlington, churches in the Greensboro area are planning a leadership training school in Greensboro for January 8-12, with M. T. Garren as dean.

4. Elon College Sustaining Fund-

The Southern Convention, in session last May, voted to help Elon College become

more secure by means of a sustaining fund. Our conference as a part of the Conven-

tion should take its part in securing this fund.

Your committee feels that the Christian education of the people of our churches demands our best efforts. We would stress the importance of using the best literature available, with reference to print, pictures, and interpretation of material. Our own Pilgrim Press materials are worthy of our consideration.

We recommend the use of the best equipment available: chairs and tables of the right kind, visual and audio aids, and all kinds of material for children and young

people to work with.

But most of all your committee would stress the need of the *best people* as leaders and teachers. Since "religion is caught as well as taught," we feel that no matter how fine and expensive the equipment or how plentiful the literature, unless we have consecrated teachers and leaders our efforts will come to naught.

Pending the adoption of the report of the Committee on Christian Education, Miss Pattie Lee Coghill spoke on "Christian Education for Church Youth." The report was then adopted.

Rev. W. J. Andes presented "Plans for the Elon College Sustaining Fund." Dr. Wm. M. Brown spoke of the needs of Elon College and urged

the support of the Sustaining Fund.

A motion was made and passed that an expression of sympathy be sent Dr. L. E. Smith because of his illness and that we pledge our cooperation and loyalty to him and Elon College.

The report of the Committee on Home Missions was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS AND RURAL CHURCH.

The Committee on Home Missions and Rural Church is glad that this year it can report to conference that new areas have been entered. In the Burlington area a new church has been formed by the name of The Beverly Hills Congregational Christian Church. Also, a lot has been purchased in West Burlington for another new work. This is the lot that the C. M. A. and the Home Mission Board voted to underwrite for a sum not to exceed \$4,000.00. Too, a lot has been given at Lake View, which is located on the road between Union Ridge and Glencoe. We understand that work is progressing on the Zion Church which was accepted into conference in the 1948 session.

This committee makes the following recommendations:

1. That the Home Mission Board and C. M. A continue to invest the majority of their aid in new work. If churches need aid in paying their minister the minimum salary set up by the Home Mission Board, we recommend that they join forces with other churches and form pastorates. If this proves impossible, we recommend that they make application to the Southern Convention Mission Board through the Conference Home Mission Board

2. That no mission grant from the C. M. A. to any church or group of churches should exceed \$300.00 except where new areas are entered, and then the decission should be left to the C. M. A. Executive Committee and the Home Mission Board.

3. That \$2,600.00 be set as a minimum salary for each minister living on the

field and giving full time to his church work.

4. That we give support to denominational and inter-denominational programs for spiritual advancement in our local communities.

The report of the Committee on Stewardship was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP.

We must put first things first. Great stress must be laid upon salvation. Men must be challenged anew with things of God-and as, and when, and if men can be made to accept that challenge, money will take care of itself. For it follows just as surely as night follows day, that when a man gives his life to God, he will with his gold support the things of God.

We cannot seem to remember that the Master and his chosen disciples ever had a budget. We cannot seem to remember at any one of his gatherings that he took a collection. But we do recall that at the end of many exhortations, he said, "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God and his righteousness and all of these things shall be added

We recommend stronger pulpits that will set men afire for Jesus Christ, that will lead to new and deeper consecration, that will concern themselves first with the salvation of their memberships. When this is done, then it will follow in quick and natural order that men will put first things first, and men will give of their substance that missions might be supported, churches built, programs strengthened, and Christ's work go on.

Supt. John G. Truitt of the Christian Orphanage presented twenty children from the orphanage, and these gave a very fine program.

By authority of the vote of the conference in adopting the report of the Committee on the Ministry, Dr. S. C. Harrell, president of the conference, licensed Lester Stanley of the Gibsonville Church as a Conference Licentiate to preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Dr. W. T. Scott led the prayer.

The benediction was pronounced by Dr. J. G. Truitt.

WEDNESDAY—MORNING SESSION.

The hymn and prayer were led by Rev. R. T. Woodruff, Jr., as conference convened at 9:30 a.m.

Minutes of Tuesday's sessions were read and approved.

The following visitors were introduced to the conference and accorded the privileges of the floor: Mrs. F. C. Lester, Rev. Duane Vore, Professor W. D. Davie of Wales and of Duke University, Miss Frances Query.

Dr. W. T. Scott called the attention of conference to the fact that the Ivy Hill Church was not an organized church and should be dropped from the Conference Roll of Churches. The secretary was asked to take this under advisement, dropping the church if such were the case.

The report of the Committee on Religious Literature was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

In these days of so much undesirable literature, we feel it important that our church families put greater effort into promoting more intelligent reading in the home. We especially think that our children and youth should be exposed to and encouraged to read the best in books and magazines.

A combination of the world's best literature is the Bible; the basis for all Christian literature is the Bible; yet it is the "forgotten book" in many of our homes today. We strongly recommend that it be made a "must" on all reading lists. Try reading complete books rather than portions, or taking certain passages from their original setting. There are also fine books about the Bible which make it more easily read. "Using the Bible with Children" by Lewis is an excellent one.

The Christian Sun, the official publication of our own church, might be properly characterized as a magazine for the family. This weekly paper keeps us posted on the "doings" of our people at home and abroad, with news and articles of interest for all age groups. A subscription to this magazine will help to solve your Christmas shopping problems, too.

Our Division of Christian Education is publishing a series of books of special interest to children. Available now are "Let's Celebrate Christmas," "The Church Grows," and "The Family Looks at One World." These are all excellent and should be used in homes where there are children regardless of what Sunday school materials are being used.

For young people there is Pilgrim Fellowship News, a copy of which is sent five times a year to each church free of charge.

Other suggested reading materials are Children's Religion and The Missionary

Herald.

We would also recommend that each church start a library of books that would be helpful for teachers, leaders, parents and other adult groups, with the suggestion that our Educational Secretary of the Southern Convention be consulted as to the selection of useful material.

To be informed is to be prepared. The selection of the best in literature is the

prime requisite.

MRS. D. M. ESTES.

Pending the adoption of the above report, Rev. Duane Vore, chairman of the Southern Convention Board of Publications, presented *The Christian Sun*. Discussion followed. The report of the Committee on Religious Literature was adopted.

The report of the Committee on Budget and Apportionments was adopted.

Miss Frances Query gave a report on the work of the North Carolina Council of Churches.

The recommendation of the Executive Committee concerning the Lynchburg Church was moved and seconded to be adopted. Twenty-five minutes was the time limit for discussion. Mrs. C. L. Grossman introduced J. W. Tolley, who presented and explained the recent vote of the Lynchburg Church. Others who spoke were: Dr. W. M. Brown, Dr. C. E. Newman, Dr. Mary Frances Thelen, Dr. F. C. Lester, Dr. W. T. Scott, Rev. T. G. Humphries. Rev. Duane Vore was asked to lead the conference in prayer before the vote on the recommendation. The recommendation was adopted by a vote of fifty in favor and three opposed.

Dr. Douglas Horton spoke on the subject: "Our Christian World Mission."

The report of the Conference Historian was presented. Condensed, it was as follows:

REPORT OF HISTORIAN.

Since our last conference the trustees of the James O'Kelly Cemetery Foundation have held two meetings. They have attempted to secure a right-of-way from the state highway to the cemetery, eight-tenths of a mile, but this could not be secured. At present the plantation path is being improved so as to be passable at all seasons of the year. The trustees were authorized by the Southern Convention to raise \$500.00 to improve the cemetery. Discovering later that this was not enough, the Executive Board of the Convention authorized the continuance of the campaign until the amount necessary to make the needed improvements was in hand. This conference contributed \$384 of the total amount in hand.

A great-great grandaughter of Mr. O'Kelly, Miss Lillie Fowler of Mebane, N. C., is to catalogue the names of all the O'Kelly family buried within the rock wall of

the O'Kelly cemetery.

Some donations have been made during the past year to the Church History room in the Elon College Library building. I have continued my work in preparing the history of each individual church in this conference, and I hope to complete the same as soon as data san be secured. The history of nearly three-fourths of the churches has been prepared, bound by a printer and is ready to be placed in the History Room. I have also several histories of churches of the Eastern Virginia Conference, prepared by my brother, Dr. N. G. Newman.

The Home Mission Board of this conference in 1899 voted to assign Rev. L. I. Cox to home mission work in Greensboro, N. C., for one-fourth of his time at a salary

of \$100.00 for the year. Mr. Cox began there in November, 1899, preaching on Sunday afternoons in the Friends Church. A building committee was appointed and a lot was purchased for \$750.00. In June, 1900, a church was organized with twenty-seven charter members. A neat brick church was built and finally dedicated on June 1, 1909. During the pastorate of Dr. C. H. Rowland, a parsonage was purchased. In 1935 the cottage adjoining the church lot was added to the church property. Dr. Rowland retired after thirteen years of service there, and the present pastor, Dr. W. E. Wisseman of Texas, succeeded him.

In 1947, the members began to plan for a new building. Lots were purchased in a desirable residential part of the city One Sunday in November, 1949, \$57,000.00

cash and subscriptions were added to the \$42,000 already in the building fund.

Palm Street Church was organized in 1905, in Greensboro, with twenty-seven members, and Rev. L. F. Johnson was the first pastor. This was a branch church of the First Church. Sunday school rooms were added to the small building and a parsonage was bought. Eight men from this church have entered the ministry. A

new building, costing more than \$50,000.00 is under construction.

The Durham Church is just ten miles from O'Kelly's Chapel, the first Christian Church built in North Carolina. In 1885, Dr. W. T. Herndon and J. H. Moring conceived the idea of establishing a church in Durham. Each of these were great-grandsons of James O'Kelly and each was a member of O'Kelly's Chapel. In 1886, the conference authorized Dr. Herndon to organize a mission work in Durham, and the Mayor's office was secured for holding services. In 1887, a church was organized with fifty charter memebrs. In 1889, it was reported to conference that a lot had been purchased for \$375.00, and there was \$800.00 in cash and subscriptions in a building fund. The first building was a medium size frame structure with a basement. Soon there was need for a larger building, and a lot was purchased at a cost of \$2,500.00. Soon after this the Main Street Methodist Church sold our people their house of worship for half its value, \$6,000.00. Our church was served by ten different pastors from 1887 until 1919, when Rev. S. C. Harrell of the Eastern Virginia Conference accepted the work, and he is the present pastor. In 1923, the building was remodeled at a cost of \$18,000.00. In 1949, a campaign was begun to raise money for an educational building and this has been built at a cost of \$65,000.00.

Third Avenue, Danville, had its beginning in a two-room school house on Third Avenue. The church was organized October 14, 1914, by Rev. S. B. Klapp and Dr. W. A. Harper, president of Elon College, with twenty-eight charter members. In this same year a brick house of worship was built, forty by sixty feet, and with three Sunday school class rooms. Seven ministers have served this church. Rev. M. T. Sorrell has been the pastor since 1926. During this period the church has had a remarkable growth, until today it is an institutional church. Eight times since 1926 the church building has undergone changes and additions. The church property covers an entire block and the value of the property is not far from one hundred thousand dol-The financial program calls for more than \$40,000.00 annually, and this is raised by free-will offerings. The church gives over \$5,000.00 each year to Foreign Missions and has a board known as the "Missions Crusaders" which handles all of the mission work of the church. In 1937, Faith Home was founded by this church. It began its work in that year with five children, and it cares regularly for more than thirty children. These children are kept until permanent homes can be found. It is now a non-sectarian institution, managed by a board of directors. The property value is \$30,000.00, and the annual budget is \$10,000.00.

Reidsville Church was organized on July 14, 1915, by Rev. L. I. Cox, with thirty-one charter members. The first service was held in the Seminary Building. Later, a lot was purchased on Montgomery Street and a brick house of worship was built. In 1935 a Sunday school annex was added with all of the rooms and facilities that go with a modern plant. Much growth is reported in all phases of the work.

Zion Church, near Burlington, N. C., is nearing completion of the two-story

Sunday school building, with all bills paid at the present time.

The new brick building at Bethlehem will be ready for use February 1, 1951. Since Rev. G. C. Crutchfield became pastor in April of this year, thirty-four members have been added, all old and current bills have been paid, and \$1,200.00 is in the treasury.

Concord has completed a handsome brick house of worship. Haw River is making improvements to the church. Union (N. C.) is preparing to build a new educational

building. Happy Home raised \$3,000.00 on one Sunday and paid the parsonage debt. Apple's Chapel is building a Sunday school building and will have it completed by December 31. Rev. J. R. Lackey has recently been called as fulltime pastor.

Burlington has recently spent \$3,000.00 in repairs and in 1951 plans to redecorate the church sanctuary and repair the old parsonage. A fulltime director of Religious Education is employed and a week-day kindergarten has been set up with thirty pupils. Burlington is interested in three mission points within the city. Lots have been donated in the Beverly Hills section and a hut has been built. W. T. Scott, Jr., a student in Yale Divinity School, conducted a Bible School there this past summer. A lot has been purchased in West Burlington.

New Lebanon has completed a new house of worship, costing \$30,000.00.

October 29, 1950, Hines Chapel raised oved \$1,600.00 to clear the parsonage of debt.

Union (Va.) is now building an eight-room parsonage costing around \$10,000.00.

C. E. NEWMAN, *Historian*.

Pending the adoption of the above report, Mrs. Oma Johnson spoke of the Church History Room at Elon College. The report of the historian was adopted.

Conference adjourned for lunch, and Rev. G. C. Crutchfield led the closing prayer.

WEDNESDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference reconvened at 1:30 p.m. The hymn and prayer were led by Rev. T. G. Humphries.

The report of the Committee on Superannuation was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUPERANNUATION.

Southern Convention contributions for 1949 to regular Superannuation funds were \$4,099.77; Christmas Fund, \$557.30; making a total of \$4,657.01. Of this amount the

North Carolina and Virginia Conference contributed \$1,485.00.

Present regular pension grants to retired ministers and ministers' widows total approximately \$5,736 (\$4,283 for ministers and \$1,453 for widows). In addition to the total annual regular grants, the division of Ministerial Relief mails to pensioners and others in need checks at Christmas time and at other times for emergencies. The funds for these extra checks come from the proceeds of the Christmas Fund of the Congregational Christian Churches. You will see above that we have contributed last Christmas \$557.30. The contributions received by ministers and widows at Christmas time was approximately \$1,500. Thus you will see that while we are contributing about \$4,600 a year to Superannuation, our National Board is actually paying about \$7,200 to our retired ministers and ministers' wives.

At the present time ten ministers and nine ministers' widows are receiving reg-

At the present time ten ministers and nine ministers' widows are receiving regular pensions from the Board of Superannuation through the Division of Ministerial Relief of the Board of Home Missions of Congregational Christian Churches, New

York.

Our Congregational Christian Churches provide an excellent plan for ministers to provide for their own retirement by participating in the Annuity Fund. This is an opportunity which our ministers should not miss, and it is the duty of our churches to assist in payment of the annual dues. The regular plan provides for annual dues of 6 per cent of a pastor's salary. To the regular dues is given \$45.00 by the Pilgrim Memorial Fund of the Annuity Fund, and the church is supposed to pay one-half of the balance and the minister one-half. While 6 per cent is required dues, it has been found that it will take 11 per cent to adequately provide for retirement, and it is recommended that our churches pay 8 per cent and the minister pay 3 per cent.

At the present time, the following pastors are members of the Annuity Fund in the North Carolina and Virginia Conference: W. J. Andes, M. W. Andes, F. E. Reynolds, G. H. Veazey, W. E. Wisseman and H. E. Robinson. This means that most

of our pastors in the North Carolina and Virginia Conference are not members of the Annuity Fund. This is a grave mistake on the part of the pastors and churches. We strongly urge the laymen of our churches to take steps to see that their respective ministers are members of the fund. No doubt most pastors are not members of the Annuity Fund because they have hesitation to approach the churches and ask them to pay a share of the dues. The Committee on Superannuation and Superintendent Scott will be happy to confer with any church or pastor on this important matter. Most business concerns provide through Social Security for their employees. Ministers are not eligible for Social Security. Therefore, it is morally right to expect that the churches will avail themselves of an opportunity to discharge their obligation to their pastor by participating with him in the Annuity Fund.

D. R. FONVILLE, M. T. SORRELL, C. E. SIMPSON.

The report of the Committee on Superannuation was adopted.

On point of personal privilege, Dr. W. T. Scott presented the suggestion to reconsider the action of the conference regarding the Lynchburg Church. The motion was made and carried that the conference reconsider the action taken in the morning session regarding the Lynchburg Church. A motion, made by W. E. Wisseman and seconded by K. D. Register, carried by a vote of 32 in favor and one against that in lieu of the recommendation of the Executive Committee of the conference, the superintendent of the Southern Convention and the chairman of the Mission Board be instructed to meet with a committee of the Lynchburg Church and with a committee of the Methodist Church, headed by the superintendent of that district, to seek a solution of the problems of our Lynchburg Church and to explore the idea of a Federated Church there, and that the Executive Committee be given the power to act for the conference.

The report of the Committee on Evangelism was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM.

Another conference year has come and gone. We, your Committee on Evangelism, wish to call attention to the most important matter of the Church, that of winning souls to Jesus our Lord.

At Ingram last fall, we as a conference, went on record as approving the United Evangelistic Advance sponsored by the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America. This special evangelistic effort of fifteen months' duration is to culminate in less than sixty days, the 31st of December of this year. Just what the total results

will be heaven only knows.

Your committee has endeavored, at least to some degree, to create and maintain evangelistic interest during the past conference year. Evangelistic institutes were conducted at Reidsville, Danville, Winston-Salem, Asheville, Greensboro, Union (N. C.), and here at Shallow Ford. Four hundred and twenty-five people attended these institutes, including twenty pastors, and there were thirty-two participating churches. We do not know what our conference gains and losses have been this year, but we do know what our standing orders are. The Captain of our Salvation says today as he said ninteen centuries ago, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go, therefore, and make disciples of all the nations; baptize them into the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit; and teach them to observe every command which I have given you; and remember I am with you always, day by day, until the close of the age."

Therefore, in the full orbed light of our Savior's command and commission, we most earnestly recommend that the evangelistic emphasis of the United Evangelistic Advance in the past year be continued in every church as we go forward in the Mas-

ter's name in the coming conference year.

We further recommend that every church within the conference, each church in its own way, using methods best adapted to the individual church, set as an evangelistic goal at least ten per cent gain in church membership for the next conference year. In order to achieve this goal, it will mean love, devotion and prayer, to and for his holy cause.

THURMAN BOWERS, M. V. WELCH, W. W. SLOAN, TUCKER G. HUMPHRIES, FRANK W. MURTTFELDT.

The report was adopted.

The report of the Committee on Social Action was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL ACTION.

The emphasis of the Christian Gospel is on the changed character of men. At the same time there is a needed emphasis for changes in laws and social institutions. This is necessary because man is conditioned and influenced by social policies and practices. This committee recommends that each church recognize such inter-relations and that each church organize a committee for Social Action if it does not have one.

The task of the Christian Church is to make the teachings of Jesus Christ relevant to given situations. In the content of her action she must be guided by the supreme form of love to God and love to neighbor. Your committee, therefore, recommends that each person as a member of the Christian community reexamine his attitudes and actions from the perspective of Christian love in such matters as race relations, industrial relations, international relations, and interdenominational relations.

The report was adopted.

The report of the Committee on Memoirs was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS.

WILLIAM PARKYN JACKSON.

Rev. William Parkyn Jackson was born in Canada, in 1873, and died in Asheville, N. C., June 16, 1950. He was the son of a Congregational minister and was educated at Collegiate Institute, Gill University, and Canada Congregational College. He was ordained a minister in the Congregational Church in 1905. In 1904 he married Miss Cora Mae Kinney of Madrid, N. Y. He is survived by his wife and other relatives.

Mr. Jackson, at the time of his death, was pastor emeritus of our Asheville Church, from which church the funeral services were held. Interment was in Burlington, Vermont.

Following his ordination, Mr. Jackson served four parishes in the North. Then he became superintendent of a community club for young men and boys in St. Albans, Vt., and during World War I he represented the War and Navy Departments in training camp activities. For more than twenty years following this service, Mr. Jackson represented the National Recreation Association, retiring in 1938 and coming to Tryon to make his home. In 1939, he became part-time supply pastor for the Asheville Church, and in 1940 he became full-time pastor and continued for five years as such.

Throughout his life, young people were his major interest and care. When confined to his home, he taught Bible to a group of young people. He loved water-color painting and his habit of extensive reading continued almost to the end. His faith and courage allowed him to attend church services even when his health was very poor, especially after his retirement from the active ministry.

JOHN S. CARDEN.

Rev. John S. Carden was born on March 29, 1863, and died on November 25, 1949, at his home in Durham, N. C. On August 22, 1889, he married Miss Betty Sue Allison, and in August, 1949, they celebrated their sixtieth wedding anniversary.

Soon after his marriage, Mr. Carden felt called of God to enter the ministry. He spent several years in study at Caldwell Institute and at Elon College. On November 23, 1900, he was ordained to the ministry, and for forty years he served churches in this and other conferences.

The outstanding characteristics of our brother were his pleasing gift of humor, love for people, revivalistic talent, sincere piety and strong faith in God. He was a

good practical preacher and gifted in public prayer.

We, therefore, move the adoption of this report and, pending the same, that conference stand with bowed heads as an expression of our love and appreciation for these brethren, and then the president of the conference lead in prayer.

C. E. NEWMAN, W. A. RICH.

The report was adopted, and Dr. S. C. Harrell led the prayer.

The report of the North Carolina Woman's Conference was presented by Mrs. F. C. Lester, retiring president, as follows:

REPORT OF NORTH CAROLINA WOMAN'S CONFERENCE.

The women in our churches in North Carolina cooperate in worship, study and giving for Missions, in the broadest sense of that term. During the past year we have united in the study of the Gospel and Letters of John, our mission work in Japan, and in ways which churches work cooperatively in the United States. Our giving amounted to \$9,120.97, or which \$1,656.59 was our Thank Offering for the Han Mei School in Shaowu, China, and \$490.00 was given for Life Memberships and Memorials, which fund is now being used to educate Timothy Chang at Duke Divinity School.

A new experiment was the Family Life Institute, held at Elon College last spring, for the whole of North Carolina, rather than district rallies for area groups. Dr. Paul Reynolds was the guest speaker. The School of Missions, also held at Elon College, provided opportunity for the women of the entire Southern Convention to gain insight into the studies for this year, through the leadership of Dr. Ernest Trice Thompson, Miss Margaret Blemker, and Dr. Fred Wentzel. Mrs. John G. Truitt was the able chairman of this school. The annual fall conference for North Carolina women was held at Liberty (Vance) Church, with Dr. Ruth I. Seabury as speaker. Reported as "Superior Societies" from the churches in this conference were: Apple's Chapel, Belew Creek, Bethel, Burlington, Elon College, Greensboro First, Greensboro Palm Street, Hines Chapel, Ingram, Monticello, Reidsville, Salem Chapel, Union Ridge, Virgilina and Winston-Salem.

During this year, our theme is "Thy Will To Do." We are to study "Great

During this year, our theme is "Thy Will To Do." We are to study "Great Bible Prayers," mission work in the Near East, and how churches serve their communities. Our Thank Offering is to redecorate and renovate Whitley Memorial Auditorium at Elon College. Our new president is Mrs. W. J. Andes.

The report of the Committee on Ministerial and Church Ethics was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL AND CHURCH ETHICS.

We, as your committee, solicited through *The Christian Sun* and through private correspondence, amendments and additions to the code of ethics presented to the conference last year. (See 1949 Annual, pages 95 and 96.) Since no amendemnts or additions have been received, we recommend the final adoption of said code of ethics, and the circulation of the code among all pastors, present and future, of the conference, and all duly elected officers of the respective churches of the conference, with a request that the copy be made a permanent part of the equipment of the office to be passed on from office-holder to office-holder as the office may change hands.

R. T. WOODRUFF, JR., A. L. HURDLE, W. W. SLOAN.

The report of the Committee on Laymen's Fellowship was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LAYMEN'S FELLOWSHIP.

A laymen's meeting was held at Elon College with over five hundred laymen present. This was a Convention-wide meeting, and all five conferences were repre-

sented. Our National executive secretary, Walter Graham, was with us.

We are not able to give the number of churches that held Laymen's Sunday services this year, but several churches reported such services. Our Convention chairman was very helpful in materials for these services. If this material was not used at that time, it can be used at another time. We would urge the churches that did not observe Laymen's Sunday this year to try it next year.

Some churches have had father and son banquets. Several churches have organ-

ized local units of the Laymen's Fellowship.

One of our conference officers attended the General Council and was present at the laymen's program. Several district meetings have been held. District 3 held several meetings, with attendance at about 100 at each meeting. District 1 held a meeting at Pleasant Grove on July 30 and elected officers. Dr. Fred Helsabeck, dean of Lynchburg College, spoke on "The Layman and His Community." Other speakers were Dr. W. M. Brown and Rev. H. E. Robinson. Plans are under way to have a meeting of District 2 in the near future.

The officers of District 1 are: Charlie McKinney, chairman, Reidsville, N. C.; J. K. Landrum, vice-chairman, Vernon Hill, Va.; Louis Owen, secretary, 1334 Jeffress Ave., So. Boston, Va.; Franklin Overby, treasurer, Nelson, Va. Officers of District 3 are: A. L. Hook, chairman, Elon College, N. C.; A. H. Blalock, secretary, R. 2, Burlington, N. C.

We would urge the local groups to use the literature and materials available through the Convention office and our National Director's office. We would urge every layman to subscribe to the Christian Laymen and to the Fellowship.

We recommend that the Program Committee of the conference arrange for a

Laymen's Fellowship Banquet at the next session of conference.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

We, your Committee on Finance, have carefully examined the records of the treasurer of the North Carolina and Virginia Conference and find them to be correct and in order.

1. That the secretary be paid \$75.00 for cost involved in the transaction of his duties during the past year.

- 2. That the bills for Annuals, report blanks and programs be paid on the receipt of same by the treasurer.
- 3. That \$300 be paid to the North Carolina Council of Churches and \$75 to the Virginia Council of Churches.
- 4. That the Executive Committee of the conference be given the power to act on any request from the Conference Missionary Association during the year 1950-51.
- 5. That the conference treasurer be authorized to pay the expenses of guest speakers and other expenses incurred during this session of conference.
- 6. That \$50 be appropriated to the Laymen's Fellowship of the North Carolina and Virginia Conference for 1950-51; and that \$50 be given the North Carolina and Virginia Pilgrim Fellowship for 1950-51.

The report of the Committee on Resolutions was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

We, your Committee on Resolutions, wish to recommend the following:

- 1. That we thank the pastor and people of the Shallow Ford Church for their generous hospitality in providing for our needs and comforts.
- 2. That we express our appreciation to the officers of the conference and to the speakers for the information and inspiration given us. We would like especially to express our appreciation for our national officers, Dr. Douglas Horton and Dr. Ross Sanderson, who have shared much with us.
- 3. That we send greetings to Dr. L. E. Smith, president of Elon College, whose prsence we have missed and express to him our hopes for a speedy recovery from his illness.
- 4. That we thank God for the services of Rev. and Mrs. Richard L. Jackson and Dr. and Mrs. Edward Riggs in Shaowu, China, and pray our Father God that his guidance will be with them as they make adjustments in their new fields of service.

The minutes of this day's session were read and approved.

By motion, the secretary was authorized to complete the minutes of this session, and that, following the prayer of Dr. Ross Sanderson, the conference adjourn to meet Tuesday after the second Sunday in November, 1951, with the Reidsville Church.

Dr. Ross Sanderson closed the session with prayer.

The 1950 Conference was adjourned.

North Carolina Christian Conference, Inc. Minutes of the Executive Committee

FEBRUARY 26, 1927 - MAY 3, 1944

* * * * *

At Greensboro, N. C., December 9-10, 1925, at the 100th annual session of the North Carolina Christian Conference, Inc., (chartered in 1919) (page 126, Volume 54—1926 CHRISTIAN ANNUAL) voted:

FIRST: We recommend that the North Carolina Christian Conference in session elect the Executive Committee to be the Board of Directors of the North Carolina Christian Conference, Inc., and for the ad-interim period that the Executive Committee of said conference shall have all the powers and prerogatives of a Board of Directors, said Executive Committee to be elected by the said conference.

SECOND: That the conference meet next year (1926) for a two-day session on

Wednesday after the first Sunday in December.

The conference voted to adjourn as above indicated.

At Burlington, N. C., December 7, 1926, the Christian Missionary Association met, and President Wicker stated, "The meeting of this association was to have been in conjunction with the session of the North Carolina Christian Conference, but since no church has invited the conference, this (C. M. A.) meeting is called to devise plans for the Christian Missionary Association."

The Executive Committee of the North Carolina Christian Conference was called in session February 26, 1927, at Raleigh, N. C., by the chairman, Dr. W. C. Wicker. Action taken by the committee is as follows:

FIRST: Mr. Geo. T. Whitaker, Franklinton, N. C., chairman of the Building Committee of the Franklinton Christian Church, was authorized to have a mortgage executed in favor of the person lending money with which to build a parsonage. The mortgage to cover the parsonage and lot on which same is to be erected, it being the

part of the lot on which the Franklinton Christian Church now stands.

Second: A resolution was presented by the First Christian Church, Raleigh, N. C., requesting that the title of property at the northeast corner of the intersection of Hillsboro and Dawson Streets be transferred to a Board of Trustees to be named and elected by the United Christian Church, Incorporated, Raleigh. The United Christian Church, Incorporated, to continue in fellowship with the Southern Christian Convention and to hold membership in the North Carolina Conference of Congregational Churches. The committee approved the request of the First Christian Church. The conditions of approval being set forth in a reply to the First Christian Church by this committee.

On March 21, 1935, the Executive Committee deeded to The Mission Board of the Southern Christian Convention, Inc., the church and parsonage property of the Christian Church, Franklinton, N. C.

In August, 1937, the Executive Committee of the North Carolina Christian Conference, Inc., executed a deed to the Trustees of Elon College, transferring the interest of the conference in a bequest made by John Campbell of certain property in Moore County, N. C. This land was devised

to grantors by will of John Campbell. (See Wills Book "J," folio 311, and also Deed Book No. 109, folio 528, Moore County Registry.)

The Executive Committee of The North Carolina Christian Conference, Inc., was called in session at Reidsville, N. C., May 3, 1944, by the Rev. G. O. Lankford, vice-president of the conference and member of the committee. Members present: G. O. Lankford and L. L. Vaughan, secretary of the conference and member of the committee.

The purpose of the meeting was to elect a member of the Executive Committee to succeed the late Dr. W. C. Wicker, president of the North Carolina Christian Conference and chairman of the Executive Committee. The name of the Rev. Stanley C. Harrell was proposed by L. L. Vaughan for membership on the Executive Committee, and without objection he was duly elected. The Rev. G. O. Lankford moved that the Rev. Stanley C. Harrell be made chairman of the committee and president of the North Carolina Conference in the interim. The motion prevailed. Dr. Harrell, being present, accepted.

There being no other business for consideration by the committee, a motion for adjournment was made and carried.

FRIENDLY SERVICE.

If every society in our Valley Conference could set as its goal one home and one overseas package, the results would be most gratifying. Shall we enter into our Friendly Service work this year with a new zeal, remembering that all that we do in this field is done in love in his Name and for the sake of our own brothers at home and around the world.

MORNING SESSION.

The Eastern Virginia Woman's Missionary Conference of Congregational Christian Churches met in its thirty-eighth annual session on October 3, 1950, with the Suffolk Christian Church, Suffolk, Va. The meeting was called to order by the president, Mrs. W. T. Harrell, at 10:10 a.m. Hymn, "Come, Thou Almighty King." Meditation, "Thy Will to Do,"

The Report of the President was made by Mrs. W. T. Harrell as follows:

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT.

This year 1949-50 has been filled with busy and happy days, for I have met so many nice people all over the entire Eastern Virginia Conference area and have discovered so many worthwhile and important things being done by our women's groups in our churches. It has been a wonderful privilege to visit you and observe work being done in the name of the Master whose joy it was to do his Father's will.

Last November I attended the Joint Fellowship assembly at the Cleveland Hotel, Cleveland, Ohio. I will long remember the fellowship with so many Christian women; the inspiring messages of great Christian leaders; the World Friendship Banquet presided over by our own beloved Dr. Ruth I Seabury. My report of the Assembly was given at each of our three District Leaders' Institutes in February. But here, may I express my deep gratitude to you women of the Eastern Virginia Wmoan's Missionary Conference for sharing part of my expense thus making this opportunity pos-The high quality of the sessions and outstanding speakers made this a memorable experience.

District Leaders' Institutes were instituted this year for the first time. They were held in February at the following places, Wakefield (Burton's Grove as host church), South Norfolk, and Suffolk. With the assistance of our District Superintendents, I arranged all three of these institutes.

This year our Spring Rallies were combined so that only one rally was held in the form of a Family Life Institute. This was arranged in order to have the services of Dr. Paul Reynolds, National Family Life Secretary. We will have three Spring Rallies next year; one in each of the three districts. The dates are as follows: Waverly, March 27th; Suffolk, March 28th; and Norfolk, March 29th.

I gave book reviews on the current mission theme in the following places: Bethlehem (Cypress Chapel and Liberty Spring attending), Newport News, Congregational Christian Temple (Bay View and Little Creek attending), Holy Neck, Mt. Zion, Berea (Nansemond), Isle of Wight (Antioch and Windsor attending), and First Church, Portsmouth (Elm Avenue attending). A missionary address on the current theme was given by your president at Johnson's Grove Church in August.

I have written many letters and cards about our work. I have answered every

letter or card promptly giving you whatever assistance you desired.

Your president is a member of the Woman's Convention Board, the Mission Board and the Executive Committee of the Elon College Sustaining Fund. Most of

these bodies meet twice a year-and sometimes more.

To the members of our Woman's Missionary Conference Board, I wish to express my thanks, for you have been so cooperative in carrying the suggested program into our local women's groups. A special word of appreciation to Mrs. L. W. Stagg, our retiring secretary, who has worked so diligently in helping me carry on the work of our conference.

May we prayerfully begin the year 1950-51 by dedicating ourselves, our stremgth, our gifts, and our talents to do the will of our Father.

REPORT OF SUFFOLK DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT.

During the past year, we have witnessed many changes because of world conditions. Some of our missionaries have been recalled from the Far East. However, our beloved Dick and Dorothy Jackson and Dr. and Mrs. Riggs, prefeering to remain in China, have continued their ministry. Having dedicated themselves completely to God's service, they are prefectly willing to give their lives if need be. May our continued prayers sustain them and our support increase.

With this challenge before them, the women of the Suffolk District have during the past year, endeavored to dedicate themselves more completely to the Master's work. Through prayerful planning and cooperation the work has been most gratifying and I wish to thank every officer and member who has made it possible.

In the nineteen churches there are twenty organized Woman's Missionary Socities, with a combined membership of 957. This shows a loss of five members during the year. Perhaps this could be improved if all of the socities would put forth a greater effort in the solicitation of new members for the ensuring year.

Each group has presented a well-planned devotional service for each meeting and all have conducted the Bible Study.

All socities have sent in detailed reports. They reported using the packet and study books. Seventeen used the Guide Posts and Missionary Herald. In the twenty socities there are 421 subscriptions to The Christian Sun, 56 to Missionary Herald, 44 to Guide Posts, 9 to Advance and 11 to Church Women.

Nineteen socities sent Friendly Service gifts. Thirteen gifts were sent to the Migrant Center, West Palm Beach, Florida, and nine to Japan. Franklinton, Carroll County, Elon Orphanage, C. M. A., C. W. V. R., and the T. B. Seal were also assisted through Friendly Service. Seventeen groups contributed to Community Service projects by remembering the needy and shut-ins. One group conducted devotionals with shut-ins. Another group contributed \$1,101.00 on the Building Fund for the parsonage. Another group installed a stove, new floors and venetian blinds in the Community Hall and another group contributed \$30.00 for a visual aid projector.

Only four groups own visual aid equipment. One society has access to Veteran's Administration Equipment. Fourteen groups reported having used visual aid with bor-

rowed equipment and two viewed pictures with other groups.

Nineteen socities sent Thank Offerings to our Conference Treasurer.

Twenty socities observed the World Day of Prayer, while eighteen observed World Community Day and seventeen observed May Fellowship Day, most of the groups cooperating with other churches.

Fifteen reported having a Family Life Chairman and fifteen observed National

Family Life Week.

Fourteen socities gave a total of twenty-one Life Memberships and ten gave a total

of eighteen Memorial Certificates.

Seventeen Young People's groups have received missionary education. Sixteen used the packet and seventeen used the study books. Thirteen socities gave Friendly Service gifts. Probably we should stress this phase of our work more, since we grow by sharing. Three Life Memberships were given. Last year six Life Memberships and Memorials were given. Timothy is making a splendid record at Duke and he is depending upon our support through this channel. Let's not fail him. I wish to explain that this year has been a period of transition for the Young People but with their enthusiasm, devotion to missions and increased membership, we feel assured that their achievement will exceed past averages during the ensuring year.

There are sixteen Children's Socities in our District. Fourteen used study books and twelve gave Friendly Service gifts. They have ten subscriptions to *Children's Re-*

ligion. One society contributed to the Thank Offering.

We have seventeen Cradle Roll Societies reporting. Sixteen of these held a pro-

gram and party and five sent Friendly Service gifts.

The total sum of money sent to the Treasurer of the Woman's Board by all of the

groups in the Suffolk District amounted to \$5,584.31.

The Family Life Institute, sponsored by the Eastern Virginia Woman's Missionary Conference, was held at Oakland Christian Church on March 23. The attendance was excellent and the program most helpful. We are grateful to Mrs. Joseph L. Moulton, Missionary to India, for a very impressive devotional service and to Dr. Paul Reynolds for his convincing address and wise counsel.

REPORT OF NORFOLK DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT.

There are eleven active Missionary Socities in the Norfolk District with an enrollment of 534 members, an increase of 34 over last year.

All of the socities reported well planned devotional programs at each meeting, and each have completed the Bible Study. Eleven observed the World Day of Prayer together with other churches. Nine observed World Community Day and eight May Fellowship Day.

There are 223 subscriptions to *The Christian Sun*; 48 to *The Missionay Herald*; 15 to *Guide Post*; 5 to *Advance*; and 15 to *The Church Woman*. Nine socities have sent news items to *The Christian Sun*.

Four of our churches have their own Visual Aid equipment which is available to the socities. Two have the privilege of borrowed equipment and six socities have enjoyed the inspiration derived from the use of films and slides. There is a desire among the women of my particular church for more films of our own work.

Twelve socities gave Life Memberships and Memorials totaling 16. The South Norfolk society gave 5 Life Memberships, the largest number contributed by any organization. Nine observed National Family Week and ten sent a Thank Offering to the Conference Treasurer.

Through Friendly Service we extend a helping hand to the needy in Japan, to Miss Angie Crew, Germany and the Migrant Work in our own country. Also provided for under privileged children at Christmas; baskets for the needy at Thanksgiving; fruit and flowers for the sick; "Pieces for Peace;" contribution for the new church at Fancy Gap; money for a Sunday School plant; gift to hospital; United Church Service and Elon Orphanage.

Nine Young People's Societies are reported. Each of these used the Packet and conducted Bible Study. Seven reported Friendly Service activities. The total enrollment at our summer camps was 48.

The active Cradle Roll organizations number 7. Six societies have had their Cradle Roll party. The Junior children are not reported organized but in two churches they contribute through the Cradle Roll and participate in their parties.

Five societies have attained the goals of a Superior Society, one has met the requirements of an Honor Roll Society and five achieved the goals of an Active Society. All have submitted their annual reports to the District Superintendent. May I at this point express my appreciation for your interest, promptness and effort during the past year to make this year the best yet record year for your society.

The Spring Rally for the Norfolk District was held at the South Norfolk Congregational Christian Church. Mrs. W. T. Harrell and Mrs. W. B. Williams were our speakers, bringing to us a thrilling account of the mid-winter meeting of the Congregational Christian and E. and R. women in Cleveland. Miss Pattie Lee Coghill was present and gave a most interesting talk on the literature and proved, as always, delightfully helpful in directing the course of study.

REPORT OF THE INTERDENOMINATION COOPERATION SUPERINTENDENT.

Register! REGISTER!!!

Will you be counted among the million Protestant Women when the Fifth National Council of Church Women meets in Cincinnati, Ohio, on November 13-15? The Ecumenical Register was explained at the Family Institute held at Oakland on March 23 and envelopes were distributed. At the District Leaders' meetings which were held at Wakefield, South Norfolk and Suffolk last spring the presidents of the socities were requested to give their members an opportunity to be listed as one of the first million women who had contributed one dollar for the enrichment of the life and work of women in the church, and for the growing unity of Christians. If you have not sent in your registration envelope, it is not too late to do so. A few weeks ago it was reported to me the women of the Congregational Christian Churches in Virginia stood third. I wish we could lead all the rest of our State!

World Community Day is not far off, on November 3rd our women will think upon the theme, "Love Thy Neighbor," last year thirty socities brought their offerings and Pieces for Peace to the altar to be dedicated to the honor of those women in other countries who need our love and care. What is the meaning of Peace? How can it come?

Love Thy Neighbor!

Begin now to plan for the World Day of Prayer on the first Friday in Lent. The 1951 theme will be "Perfect Love Casteth Out Fear." More and more we are having fellowship with the women of other denominations on this day. Last year thirty-eight groups blended their prayers with women all around the world.

"Our Daily Bread" was the theme for May Fellowship Day last year. The observance of this day is increasing with luncheons or services held with women of the whole community, twenty-nine socities participated last year. "Thank God for Work" will be discussed in 1951. An opportunity will be given the Women of the Church to seek those who are employed, expressing to them hope and strength for carrying out His will at their daily tasks.

We have not been unmindful of women and children of other lands. Gifts of clothing, money, and material have been sent through Church World Service Center in New Windsor, Maryland.

Although we have about *thirty* subscribers to the *Church Women*, it is essential for more to become readers of this publication which keeps us informed of the projects and interests of this fellowship of which we are a part.

Christian Women are the *minds* through which Christ thinks, the *hearts* through which Christ loves, the *voices* through which Christ speaks, the *hands* through which Christ helps. "The work of our hands . . . establish Thou it". . . to do Thy will united for the work of the Kingdom of God.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF FAMILY LIFE.

In March of this year I was asked to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. J. B. Gibson as Superintendent of Family Life. During these six months I have recommended, to many of the socities, literature for enriching family life and helpful programs for the observance of Family Week. I prepared one article for *The Christian Sun* encouraging attendance at the Family Life Institute and trying to interest all of our socities in the National Family Week Movement.

It is gratiyying to learn that about three-fourths of our socities have a Family Life Chairman and have sponsored worth-while programs for their church families.

In my contacts with several local Presidents I have learned that various ways have been used to emphasize the importance of family activity in the churches. Several of our socities sponsored Family Night Suppers and other social activities for family participation. One church, to my knowledge, observed Family Sunday by having all families in the parish to sit as family units. Others had movies or slides depicting family solidarity and afterwards had a social period. A considerable amount of literature for developing Christian Family Life was distributed by many of our churches.

A packet of books on Family Life has been available for the Eastern Virginia Women during the past five months, but as yet, they have not gotten into very many churches.

It is decidedly encouraging to observe the Christian Family Participation in Worship and Service is growing among our Eastern Virginia Women. Only the future will be able to reveal the fruits of their labor.

May I encourage each Family Life Superintendent to use every possible means, during the new year, to develop greater family participation in the work of the home and the Church.

REPORT OF SPIRITUAL LIFE SUPERINTENDENT.

The aims of the Spiritual Life Department for this year have been fourfold.

- 1. To see that time is taken at every meeting of every group of the Woman's Fellowship, large or small, for a well-planned devotional service.
- To encourage and stimulate the practice of personal quiet hour and family worship in the homes of the members.
- 3. To build libraries of devotional books in the local church and arrange for the circulation and use of these books.

4. Finally, and perhaps the most important of all, to contribute in every way possible to the spiritual growth of the members by lifting the concept of the meaning of church attendance, full, intelligent participation in all the work of the church.

We hope that all of our groups have followed through with this program. This year has held the possibilities of great spiritual growth and enrichment for all the women in our Fellowship through the wonderful writings of St. John, which we were priviledged to study. Also numerous other devotional life aids that were made avail-

able to every group.

Any group of intelligent women can conduct a perfect business meeting by observing rules of parliamentary law, or do great things for a needy community project, but it is definitely the business of the Church Woman to put emphasis on the building of the spiritual life of our church groups and in our own personal lives. Won't you, as Mothers, encourage your families in the strengthening of their daily devotions?

The spiritual life centers in our capacity to maintain awareness of God in the heart of daily experience. Brother Lawrence found him in the clatter of his kitchen. Matthew Arnold was aware "amid the city's jar, that there abides a peace of Thine." Iesus knew God in nights of prayer, in the grass of the field, in the faces of little chil-

dren, in the heart of the Magdalene.

Each of us can know him as we will. Spirituality is a matter of discipline leading into understanding—exercise unto Godliness. Spiritual people train themselves to sense the presence of God in life at its best. Anyone can do this. The essence of spiritual discipline is for each to discover the most promising values in her own life and purposely to direct her attention to them confidently expecting to meet her God. We shall see what we have trained ourselves to see.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF CHILDRENS DEPARTMENT.

1. Again I would like to urge you in your various churches to select, for your children's leader, a person who loves children and understands them. Children are always friendly and also close observers. They readily learn the people who love them and from them they easily learn the worth-while lessons of life. From them lasting impressions are made. May we begin to make them missionary minded.

2. If possible, this year select one Home Study Book and one Foreign Study Book. Suggested Home book, "The Busy Berrys"; suggested Foreign book, "They

Live in Bible Lands." Guides for each book are available.

3. Help the children to realize that a church is necessary to rich community liv-

ing and lead them to desire to promote in their own small ways Christian work in their

own home neighborhood and throughout the world.

4. Try in your Foreign Study to teach your children more about Bible Lands as they are today, and about the people who live there. Help them to think of them as their friends. Recall to their minds what happened in these lands in Bible times and start them finding out what has happened since. Discuss with them some of the gifts that have come to us from these lands.

5. Help them prepare and send Friendly Service gifts to these friends they have studied about. Suggested places for these gifts will be found in the Children's Year Book. Especially help them with making gifts for children; this appeals and encourage them to do things with their hands. Suggest that they gather Octagon soap wrap-

pers for their little friends at the Orphanage.

6. Last, may the year book prepared for you this year help guide you in your study in your Children's Department.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF YOUNG PEOPLE.

Our attitude toward young people and their work should not be of such a nature as to give the idea that young people are just preparing to become citizens of the Kingdom and serve, but rather that they are already a vital part and everyone has a definite place to fill. "Remember, now thy Creater in the days of thy youth."

The calendar of the young people of Eastern Virginia has been filled with activities of a very high type during the past year. Not only have thirty-three churches had organized groups (five of which are new organizations) which have been active in their own churches, but many achievements have been realized as a conference or a part of the Southern Convention.

The Spring Rally held at Holland, and the Young People's Missionary Conference at Suffolk were well attended and programs of a high type well presented.

The Young People of this conference cooperated with other conferences of the Southern Convention in sending Max Vestal to a work camp in Italy, and are looking forward to his visit and report next spring.

A very successful camp which was a project of Eastern Virginia was held at Chespeake Beach for junior high boys and girls with an attendance of about one hundred. A senior high camp was held at Elon as a Convention project with an attendance of approximately one hundred.

Mrs. W. B. Williams and Jack Byrd were our delegates to the National Conven-

tion at Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

At a meeting of the young people comprising the members of the Young People's Missionary Conference and Eastern Virginia Pilgrim Fellowship the following plan was adopted:

We recommend to the Young People's Missionary Conference and to the members of Pilgrim Fellowship that the two organizations be united under one set of officers. At the same time we recommend that if this should be done the name of the over-all organization be changed, suggesting—Youth Fellowship.

Money from this organization which had previously been sent to the Treasurer of the Woman's Missionay Conference would continue to go to her. Money for other Pilgrim Fellowship projects would go to the treasurer of the Youth Organization.

We believe that this plan would necessitate a reapportionment of the churches and

feel that this could be done by the individual churches.

The organization would hold two annual meetings, one in the spring and the other in the fall. The spring meeting would be devoted to the projects of Pilgrim Fellowship while the emphasis at the fall meeting would be missions.

Miss Pattie Lee Coghill, Jack Byrd, and others of us who are interested in the young people's work met with groups in all three districts of our conference September 17, 18 and 21, and discussed plans for the coming year. These meetings I feel will prove most helpful.

The greatest work of all done by the young people of our conference cannot be accurately given in this report. The greatest things are being done in their home churches where they are modestly working to strengthen and build up their own church and to send the good news to the uttermost parts of the earth.

The report of the Committee on Home Missions was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Virginia Valley Conference is facing some serious problems. We feel that we should face them as a challenge to our loyalty and devotion to our Christ and His Church. Both minister and laymen should face this challenge together, and go forward to greater achievements for His glory.

The hindrance of our growth numerically, financially and spiritually is because of our unwillingness to accept the way which God has given for the financing of the work of His kingdom on earth. Through evangelism we need to win back to the Church the large number who are lost to the usefulness of the Church.

We therefore recommend:

- 1. A more zealous evangelistic effort.
- 2. A more thorough teaching of Stewardship.
- 3. That the appropriation for salary aid from the Conference fund and the Mission Board be left in the hands of the Home Missions Committee and Executive Committee with power to act.
- 4. That we endorse the plan suggested by Dr. Ross W. Sanderson to make the Virginia Valley Conference a special project of denominational endeavor.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

It is estimated that five million children have been born in the South since 1947. Are we adequately shouldering our share of this staggering responsibility? Are we willing to consider it an opportunity that Christian ambition and devotion can handle in its stride? Do we have a comprehensive vision of a program of Christian education from kindergarten to college, from the cradle roll to the home department.

We, your Committee on Christian Education, would underscore our emerging opportunity in Sunday school work. More trained teachers, better teaching material, additional rooms and equipment are the paramount needs in many of our schools. All the while, be it remembered, we cannot teach them until we reach them.

Valuable assistance and capable leadership is provided through our Convention office. Our educational director, Miss Coghill, has been particularly helpful in planning summer camps and conferences, youth rallies and training schools, in which representatives of our churches participate. We look forward with confidence and optimism to the extension of these fine services, all so essential to a comprehensive program of Christian Education.

We dare not overlook the importance of Christian Education on the college level. In every church we need to have the ranks strengthened by college graduates. We look to our church college, Elon, to help recruit leaders, both in the pulpit and in the pew. It is our hope that the churches of this Conference will give their quota to the Sustaining Fund in order that Elon may not be forced to curtail any of its fine curriculum.

This is the time to put the accent on Christian Education. It is our central task. Never did we face a greater opportunity. Worship and Christian Education go hand in hand: "The hour cometh and now is when the true worshippers shall worship the Father in spirit and in truth, for the Father seeketh such to worship Him."

ROBERT LEE HOUSE, Chairman.

Dr. L. E. Smith introduced Dr. Bryant Drake, who spoke on "Our College"; also Mr. S. H. Basnight, who presented the "Sustaining Fund."

The report on Education and Standing of the Ministry was presented. After discussion by Dr. W. T. Scott, the report, by motion, was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION AND STANDING OF THE MINISTRY.

"Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" is not alone the cry of an ancient day, it is the insistant and ever increasing cry of the church today. The demands of the church for a strong ministry are not only multiplied today but they have become increasingly imperative. Professor David A. MacLellan in addressing the students of Yale Divinity School at its reopening this fall declared, "Never have competently trained, completely committed, and spiritually heroic ministers been more urgently needed than today."

This is a matter that our Conference should do something about. It is the conviction of your committee that our pastors should set aside one Sunday in the year when the challenge of the Christian ministry should be laid upon the hearts and

minds of our youth, and their parents, and serious effort be made to seek enlistment to Christian life service.

We present the following recommendations:

That John Littikin, a member of Turner's Chapel Church and of the freshman

class of Elon College be admitted to the Biblical class.

That Robert A. McLean, a member of Wake Chapel Church be granted licensure. Mr. McLean has rendered satisfactory service under the care of the Fayetteville Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church and he comes to us with the recommendation of the officials of the Presbytery. He proposes to complete his seminary training at Duke Divinity School.

That the Reverend Elmore Powell, an ordained minister of the Southern Baptist Convention be received into full membership of this Conference when he shall have transferred his church membership to a church within this Conference. Mr. Powell has presented satisfactory recommendations from the officials of the Baptist Associa-

tion of which he is a member.

That Reverends Richard L. Jackson and William L. Wood be received into full membership pending the receipt of their credentials from the Eastern Virginia Conference.

That Reverends T. Fred Wright and R. Eugene Tally be granted letters of transfer to the Eastern Virginia Conference.

That Reverends W. Clay Farrell and R. Eugene Tally who have received Conference ordination by this Conference be granted full ordination.

On January 8, 1951, the Reverend Kenneth M. Lindner, an ordained minister of the Southern Baptist Convention, appeared before your committee bearing excellent recommendations from the officials of the Baptist Association of which he is a member, and his request for full standing in this Conference was referred to the Executive Committee for favorable action.

Note should be made of the fact that the Western North Carolina Conference received into membership the Reverend James A. Denton pending the receipt of his credentials from this Conference. Mr. Denton now expresses the wish to remain a member of this Conference, and as no credentials were forwarded by this Conference, his standing remains with us unaltered.

WILL B. O'NEILL, Chairman, E. M. CARTER, T. FRED WRIGHT.

The report of the Executive Committee was presented and, on motion, was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

We, your Committee submit the following as our report:

At a meeting January 8, 1951, the Western North Carolina Conference having ordained Mr. M. L. Fogleman with Local Conference ordination and, because of his work in this Conference we voted to recognize his ordination.

Rev. Kenneth M. Lindner, an ordained minister of the Southern Baptist Convention was recommended to our fellowship and we endorsed the recommendation that

he be received in good and regular standing as an ordained minister.

On February 20, 1951, the Eutaw Community Church (Congregational Christian) of Fayetteville, N. C., was organized with eight charter members and made formal application to the Executive Committee, for membership into the Eastern North Carolina Conference, on May 7, 1951. This church holds a grant of very valuable property in the city of Fayetteville and is having regular services and Sunday school. The pastor is Rev. Kenneth M. Lindner.

Under date of Memphis, Tenn., of April 6 there came an application of Rev. B. V. Munger for transfer to the East Mississippi Presbytery. We voted to grant the

transfer which was mailed to him May 16, 1951.

The Annual Sermon was preached by Rev. Millard W. Stevens, President of The Southern Convention. His subject was "The Living Church."

The observance of the Holy Communion was conducted by Dr. R. Lee House, assisted by Dr. Will B. O'Neill.

Announcements for lunch were made by the host pastor, and Conference adjourned with benediction and blessing by Dr. L. E. Smith.

TUESDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference was called to order by the president, and, after singing a hymn, Rev. R. Eugene Tally lead in prayer.

Dr. W. T. Scott presented the "Group Insurance Plan for Ministers." After some discussion, it was moved and carried that the Conference go on record as approving the plan and that the Apportionment Committee be authorized to apportion to each church the amount of 15 cents per member in payment to the Home Life Insurance Co., of New York, through The Southern Convention, as premium for the same.

It was moved and carried that the Conference indorse the plan for ministers' dependents and that it be presented to the attention of the churches.

Miss Pattie Lee Coghill presented the subject of Christian Education in the Eastern North Carolina Conference. Dr. Bryant Drake also spoke on the subject.

Dr. John G. Truitt presented the cause of the Christian Orphanage.

The report of the Committee on Evangelism was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM.

The greatest need of the world today is the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Paul says the gospel is the power of God, unto salvation to everyone that believeth. This gospel has been at work in the world for nineteen centuries. Christ has marched through

the centuries bringing men to God, saving them from their sins, changing the destiny of nations and of all history. Great results have been achieved. The church has been created and peace given to multitudes. It has inspired men to face the dangers of heathen lands in order to carry the message of life to lost souls. It has had a tremendous influence on our social life, yet we are grieved and puzzled when we view the history of the centuries, as the gospel seems to have failed to have achieved the results that might have been accomplished. We realize that it has been successful only as men or the church has permitted.

Man has accepted the Gospel of Christ and has pledged allegiance to Him, but he has failed to go all the way with Him in His program for the salvation of the world.

Christianity can only do its good work as the Church gives it the opportunity. Christ's command is. "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." Too often man has limited the power of God.

Why has our Church grown so slowly in the area of the Eastern North Carolina Conference? Wherein have we failed? It is high time that we get down upon our knees and pray the Lord of the harvest to send laborers into His vineyard, then do all that we can to help Him answer that prayer.

THE ANNUAL of last year shows that thirteen ministers reported a total number of members received as 419. This same ANNUAL shows that 36 Churches reported the number received as 485, and a loss of 380, which leeaves a gain of 105, or about 1.6 per cent increase for that year.

One of our greatest needs is a "revitalized church membership." It has beeen stated by an inter-church authority that in the average church only about 39 per cent of the membership is regular in attendance, in giving and in serving; about 14 per cent are occasional; and 47 per cent never come, serve, or give. What can be done to restore the indifferent members to active life in the church? Should this problem be solved, evangelism would be far more successful.

We wish to make the following recommendations:

- 1. That our Sunday school officers and teachers put greater emphasis upon evangelism in the Sunday school.
- 2. That we urge our laymen to form evangelistic or visitation clubs that will seek to reach the unchurched.
 - 3. That our missionary organizations stress evangelism in their meetings and ograms.
- 4. That our pastors wherever it may seem profitable conduct pastors' classes for prospective church members. Around Easter is a good time to conduct such classes.

5. That all members seek to live a witnessing life for Christ and His Church.

By motion the Report on Foreign Missions was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Our Christian World Mission has spread before our eyes the great need of sharing God's message. As Christians we are faced as never before with the task of making our Christianity alive. There are times when we would like to think that we are giving our share, but if we would take the time to read the report in our ANNUAL and to list the benefits which have come to us through the influence of Christ and His church, we would realize we are giving little to Foreign Missions. For we know that in every one of the Foreign Mission fields of the American Board the call is for more missionaries, more Bibles and more support for national workers. But how can our hands reach out to these needy places of the earth on the small amount we are giving?

Therefore, we recommend that our Conference continue to accept this as our task of carrying on the work of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. However, it is not an easy one, but if we could reemember the three major aspects of any task are:

First—Ability—what can we do; second—Responsibility—what we should do, and, third—Willingness—what we will do. It all depends on the last, "Our Willingness." The more generous we are with God, the more generous He will be with us. God expects us to make sacrifices and if we fail Him in this way, we do not have any right to expect that He will continue to favor and prosper us in our homes, churches and business.

As we come to the end of the conference year, we are all grateful for the accomplishments that have been made in the past, and as we look to the new conference year, may we face the future with confidence and determination to do for Him by standing ready to serve the cause of Christ in every area as need arises, so that the entire world may soon be permeated by the blessings of His Gospel.

The report of the Committee on Religious Literature was presented. Dr. Scott spoke of the importance of supporting *The Christian Sun* with our subscriptions. By motion the report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

A current issue of a popular magazine carries a carton which show a family viewing a television set. The screen shows a man holding a placard which says: "Read the directions before using our product—that is, if you can still read."

Through the years we have urged our people to read the best in Christian literature and to avoid the trash. Today we face a situation in which we not only urge our people to read church literature, but we must urge them to read! This is especially true of young people who find the comic book, the funny section of the newspaper and the television set their main source of information.

Nearly all of our ministers and churches have good religious books and periodicals that they are willing to share with church people, but merely having them in not enough, they must be read and understood to be of real value. Reading is one of the nobler arts and reading aloud is a vanishing art. Let us therefore, urge families in our churches to make use of those books on the minister's or the Sunday school's shelf and use them at home. Read devotional material aloud for personal or family enjoyment. Both the Women's Convention (through their department of family life) and the Laymen's Fellowship are urging that our Convention families establish a family worship period. This period would be a golden opportunity to use the best in religious literature. Ask you minister what you should read, consult the pages of *The Christian Sun* for book reviews of good literature.

Our children need to see, handle and read the best in books. Friendship Press in New York publishes the mission study books. They are beautifully written and well illustrated and their price is within range of all pocket books. Let us buy these books for our children rather than trashy comics or cheap best sellers.

Sunday schools should review our denominational literature for use in teaching. The Pilgrim Series, while expensive, has much to offer in relating the family to the church. Ask your minister to help you get a sample of this or write to the Convention office.

For 107 years the churches of North Carolina and Virginia have published *The Christian Sun*. It is not the best religious weekly in the nation, but it is the only one we have. It tells us what is happening—if you let *The Sun* know your news—it has messages for an informed lay people, young people, children and news of the college and orphanage and work of the women. Give it your support by subscribing, reading and sending to it the things that are worth while.

We all know that we forget the things that we do not re-read and study. If we do not read our Bibles, our current religious papers and material we shall forget the task before us.

REPORT OF THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE.

By motion the report was adopted and the nominees were duly elected to the respective offices.

Dr. W. T. Scott spoke of "Our Great Need."

By motion the Conference adjourned till tomorrow morning at 9:45 o'clock. Benediction by Rev. R. Eugene Tally.

TUESDAY—EVENING SESSION.

At 7:30, the Laymen's Fellowship was called to order by the chairman, Mr. I. H. Vickery. After prayer, he gave the sixteen points of interest and spoke briefly to each point. Mr. Earl Daniely was introduced, and he gave a very forceful message.

WEDNESDAY—MORNING SESSION.

The Conference was called to order by the president.

Devotional services were conducted by Rev. Kenneth M. Lindner.

The proceedings of the previous day's sessions were read and approved.

The report of the Committee on Home Missions was presented and, after discussion by Dr. R. Lee House, was by motion adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission Fund of the Conference during the past year has worked with our Church in Fayetteville, N. C., and this is a church we should be proud of. There are others in our Conference which should be given our support. We should revive the work at Franklinton, N. C., and we should like to recommend that a fund be established within our Conference to promote work among our churches where needed.

The National Board of Home Missions stresses the work among the migrants. We aid migrant workers in our Conference throught our small contribution to the North Carolina Council of Churches. There is also a limited amount given through the Woman's Board of the Southern Convention.

The Conference recessed to give time for the Conference Missionary Association, after which Conference reconvened.

The report of the Committee on Stewardship was presented and discussed by Rev. W. C. Farrell. By motion, it was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP.

The most important business being carried on in the world today is that which is done for our Lord Jesus Christ and the salvation of lost souls. When we are fully consecrated to Him, we are ready to use whatever resources we may have as He directs.

Christians, then, should seek to give in a scriptural manner as they are constrained by the love of Christ. Such giving is then not only a duty, but a privilege attended by the blessing of God.

The manner of giving as well as the amount given is, of course, a matter for the conscience of the individual believer. However, the Bible, God's holy Word, sheds light on this form of Christian service as well as all others. Both the Old and New Testaments bear out the thought that such giving should be in proportion to the income of the giver.

The Apostle Paul sums it up well in I Corinthians 16:2: "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store, as God hath prospered him...."

We believe the greatest need of our Congregational Christian Churches today is Evangelism. And in order to evangelize there must be a new and grater emphasis on Christian Stewardship: "For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved. How then shall they call on him in whom they have not believed? And how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard? and how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach exceept they be sent. . ." Rom. 10:13, 14, 15.

We must put first things first. Our Lord Jesus Christ said in Matthew 6:33: "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God, and his righteousness and all these things shall be added unto you." We believe this will apply to the local church as well as to the individual believer.

We therefore recommend: That each pastor enlist the aid of every Christian in his church and (1) Seek, by a prayer, preaching the Gospel, and by personal work to lead the lost to a saving knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ; and (2) Seek to lead them to a new and deeper consecration, by teaching them to observe all the things our Lord has commanded us, which includes the grace of giving.

A very helpful Stewardship Institute was conducted by Dr. Jessee Dollar, at the United Church in Raleigh on October 9. We recommend that another such institute be held some time during the next year.

The report of the Committee on Apportionments was presented. It was moved and carried that the report be adopted as presented except that the apportionment for paying the dues for the Group Insurance be placed in the column with the Conference Fund. The report follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON APPORTIONMENTS.

We have observed that many of our churches have paid their conference apportionments in full, while some have paid almost the entire amount asked of them. This increase in interest and effort is indeed gratifying and heartening. There never has been a time when funds were needed for the promotion of the gospel as much as they are needed now. Before we can have a peaceful world, we must first have a Christian world. The complete dedication to Christ and His Church of ourselves and the means with which we are blessed is the only way we can be sure of doing our full part in making our world what God wants it to be.

We regret to report that there are still several churches in our Conference that do not try with any degree of seriousness to meet their conference askings in full. Some churches make no contributions whatever to this important part of their church program. We earnestly urge these churches to begin now and send in a part of their apportionments each month for the new year so when the Conference convenes in

1952 they can take pride in the fact that they are entitled to be listed along with those churches that come to Conference with everything paid in full.

We recommend that the Apportionment Table for the year 1950-1951 be accepted unchanged for 1951-1952 with the exception of the item for Ministerial Scholarship Fund. We recommend that all apportionments for this purpose involving a half dollar be increased by fifty cents to simplify bookkeeping and to provide a small additional amount for this purpose.

We ask that the churches help their ministers in the payment of their anuity dues. Each minister receives a credit of \$45.00 from the Pilgram Memorial Fund and should not pass this up. At the present time there is in the Annuity Fund for the benefit of retired ministers \$15,794-632.24. So, with the help of the churches, all ministers could become members and benefit from this fund. We also urge all the churches to be sure and receive a Christmas offering for aged ministers, as this serves a great need.

The report of the Committee on Social Action was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL ACTION.

We believe that any society is made up of individuals, and to change the whole you must change first the individual parts.

We believe further, that the only adequate basis for a real change is faith in Jesus Christ; resulting in conversion. We believe conversion, when experienced as it is taught by Paul and others, will completely change man's attitude toward God, his neighbor and himself.

We also believe that the church has, on many occasions failed to point to the differences between the Christian and the non-Christian. It has failed to emphasize that you not only accept Jesus Christ as Savior but also as Lord of your life now. Hence, you seek to think, to speak and to act as your Lord would have you to. You seek to pattern after His great spirit, in showing compassion on those who are hungry, cold and in pain; on those who are unsaved and on the unlovely; and on those who have any real physical, mental or spiritual need.

The church, if it is to stay alive must go outside its walls, and outside its own membership and community and, to the uttermost part of the earth. It must demonstrate the compassion of our Lord in mighty deeds.

Today, there are great spiritual, mental and physical needs in China, Korea, Europe, and right here in America. We need to instruct our members upon the Christian's obligations to the whole of mankind and to the whole man. We believe there is ample talent and resources awaiting the proper inspiration and instruction. We recommend that our churches teach this practical side of the Gospel.

The best method of teaching is to give opportunity and encouragement in actual participation in this program.

Our Raliegh church and Fuller's Chapel have had enriching experiences in assisting a D. P. family to relocate in their communities during the past two years.

Many churches have participated in sending clothing and food to those in need. God help us all to accept the opportunity to become the ministering hand of Christ.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

We, your Committee on Resolutions, submit the following:

- 1. That we express our appreciation to the Flower Committee for the beautiful arrangement of flowers.
- 2. That we express to President Grissom, the Program Committee and all participating, our warm appreciation for the high order of the program arranged, which shall, in God's grace, be of continuing benefit to us, in His services.
- 3. We recommend the adoption of the following as the official action of the Eastern North Carolina Conference.

"Elon College has made commendable progress and advancement in recent years. Its expanding program calls for larger and continued financial support. We recommend that in addition to the regular apportionment for the college, The Convention approve, and through its conferences and churches engage in an effort to raise a minimum average of \$1.00 per member annually for a sustaining fund for Elon College; this effort to be a co-operative one to be participated in by the college administration, the Elon College Foundation, The Convention, conferences and church officials. That a committee be constituted by this Convention, the duty of which shall be to work for The Convention in co-operation with the officials named above, to formulate the plans whereby this proposal shall be carried to the entire constituency of The Convention."

We also recommend that the present committee, headed by Dr. Robert Lee House, be continued as the official Sustaining Fund Committee for the Eastern North Carolina Conference.

- 4. That we express our accord with the praiseworthy purpose of the Christian Missionary Association and, further, that we urge a still wider participation in the matter of its support and extension.
- 5. That we express formally to the President of the United States our objection to the appointment of General Mark Clark, or any person, as Ambassador to the Vatican, as contrary to the spirit of our American heritage, and that, further, copies of our objection be sent to our representatives in Congress.
- 6. That we express, by a rising vote of thanks, our appreciation to the minister and people of our Sanford Church for all their courtesies, entertainment and generous hospitality.

The report on Sunday Schools was presented as follows:

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

The Sunday School Convention of the Eastern North Carolina Conference met at Wake Chapel Christian Church in Varina, N. C., June 27, 1951.

The theme of the day was "Sunday School, Past, Present and Future." The three periods were very ably presented by Rev. Stanley Carne, of Portsmouth, Va., Rev. Clyde L. Fields, of Ramseur, N. C., and Miss Ione Cotton, of New York, N. Y., respectively.

Representation is not the most important thing, but we were deleighted to have 26 schools reporting with the great majority of these represented. This is an improvement over the 18 present a year ago.

The highlight of the convention year was the work and results of a special Planning Committee composed of Revs. R. T. Grissom, Rex G. Powell, Will B. O'Neill and Fred Register. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SUPERANNUATION.

For the past two years the Eastern Virginia Conference has failed by a very small amount in reaching the amount asked by The Southern Convention as its apportionment for Superannuation. The first of these years, the total amount asked was reached through the over-subscription of one of the other conferences, but last year the Convention failed by approximately the amount that we fell short. We hope that the figures for this year (which are not available when this is being written) will tell another story. Those who have served us as ministers in the past and their widows deserve greater consideration than we have paid them.

We again recommend to our churches that they take a Christmas Fund offering. This should be a free-will offering over and above the amount asked in their appor-

tionment.

The personnel of the ministers of the Conference has been rapidly changing. We have not ascertained whether the newer and younger ministers who have come into Conference are members of the Annuity Fund. Any one who is not a member should give membership consideration immediately. Our churches should make it their concern to see that the minister serving them is a member.

Superintendent Scott is bringing before the Conference the question of Ministerial Insurance. This should be carefully considered as a part of our program of assistance

for the superannuated or retired minister.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

We the members of the Committee on Ministerial Education submit for your approval the following actions of our Committee during the past Conference year:

- 1. The Lincensure of Mr. Paul Varga, who has been a member of the Biblical Class at Elon College for four years, and who graduated from the college last May. He was licensed at Suffolk, Virginia, in connection with the meeting of the Ministerial Association on May 21, 1951.
- 2. The granting of a loan of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) to the Board of Publications with interest at $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent per annum. This loan was secured by a note of The Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, duly signed by the President and Secretary of the Convention, acting on the authority of the Executive Board of the Convention.
- 3. The granting of Work Scholarships of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) each to Baxter Twiddy for work done at Moonelon, and to Paul Varga for work done at Hopewell, during the summer of 1951.

We make the following further recommendations:

- 1. That George Barron of Franklin, Virginia, be admitted as a member of the Biblical Class at Elon College, to prepare himself for the gospel ministry; that he be given a scholarship of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) secured by a suitable note to the Ministerial Scholarship Fund; that he be given a proportionate share of the Educational Fund for Ministerial Students from Eastern Virginia at the college, this amount to b credited by the college on his college expense.

- 4. That Reverend Paul Varga be given a Scholarship Grant of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) to be applied to his expenses at Hartford Seminary.
- 5. That Reverends John Gallo, D. D. Nash, and M. E. Taylor be given renewals of ther Certificates of Conference Ordination.
- 6. That John G. Truitt, Jr., be Licensed to preach the gospel, and he be given a Certificate of Licensure, and that the President of the Conference make arrangements for this service of licensure at this session of Conference; that Mr. Truitt be given a proportionate share of the Educational Fund for Ministerial Students from Eastern Virginia at the college, this amount to be credited by the college on his college expense.

7. That Ruben S. Askew, Jr., of the Bay View Church, be admitted as a member of the Biblical Class at Elon College to prepare himself for the gospel ministry; and that he be given a proportionate share of the Educational Fund for Ministerial Students from Eastern Virginia at the college, this amount to be credited by the college on his college expense.

8. That the Conference Ordination of Reverend Henry George be revoked, and

that he be asked to surrender his credentials to this Committee.

Three candidates of the Biblical Class: John G. Truitt, Jr., Ruben Askew, and George Barron, were presented by their respective ministers.

Rev. Allen Hurdle and Rev. Ernest Brickhouse, new ministers coming to the Conference since last session, were presented.

On motion it was adopted that the administrators of the Ministerial Loan Fund serve in that same capacity with reference to the Ministerial Scholarship Fund.

The report on Christian Education was presented and, pending its adoption, Dr. L. E. Smith, president of Elon College, spoke emphasizing the importance of the church-related college receiving the financial support of the constituent churches.

The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

The Educational program of the church involves a sincere concern on the part of the church to provide training for the individual in every phase of Christian living. This means training for Christian thinking and action. It should develop in the individual a better understanding of the Christian conception of life, a better knowledge of the Bible, an appreciation of good music, learning in the art of worship, a higher conception of Stewardship, a love for our fellow-men, a knowledge of the church, and a greater understanding of everything that goes into the making of a better relationship between ourselves and God and between one another. This should express itself in better churchmanship and Christian living.

Our Sunday schools are the vital organs of this program and deserve the very best thought and leadership which we posess. The purpose of our Sunday schools is to teach and train; when we make it anything less they become a liability and not an asset. Therefore, we should take advantage of every available resource to make Sunday schools more effective. We should seek to install in the hearts and minds of our teachers and leaders the high worthiness of their task and inspire them to give freely of their time and energy to do the best job possible.

Our churches also have a vital stake in higher education as expressed in Elon College. The college has always required our support and always will as long as it exists as the project of our churches. We must give the college increased support now, because of inflation and decreased enrollment. We urge our churches to support the Sustaining Fund and the apportionment for Elon a hundred fold and more.

The morning session adjourned after prayer by Rev. Jesse Roberts.

WEDNESDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

The afternoon session convened at 2 o'clock.

The opening hymn was led by Rev. W. A. Grissom. Prayer by Rev. John Gallo.

The secretary presented a legal matter in connection with the disposition of the Dendron parsonage property. On motion it was voted that Floyd A. Turner, Suffolk, Virginia, be elected as a trustee of the Eastern Virginia Conference to serve with John P. Lee and Hon. Mills E. Godwin, Jr.

On motion it was voted that the Conference reaffirm its vote of last session on the disposition of the Dendron parsonage property and that the funds from its sale be turned over to the Home Mission Committee of the Conference to be divided proportionately among the three churches holding equity therein.

The report on *The Christian Sun* was given by Rev. Duane N. Vore, chairman of the Board of Publications. Supt. Scott also spoke to the report.

The report of the Christian Missionary Association was presented and, pending its adoption, the Rev. Johnson L. Griffin spoke about the financial campaign in the C. M. A. to raise an additional sum of five thousand dollars.

The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF CHRISTIAN MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION.

The Christian Missionary Associating of Eastern Virginia Conference met Tuesday, December 5, 1950, at the Berea Congregational Christian Church, Great Bridge, Virginia.

The session was called to order by the president, Rev. W. Stanley Carne, and Rev. Johnson L. Griffin was elected secretary, this office being left vacant by the death of Dr. Luther B. Grice. The Rev. Duane N. Vore, minister of the Suffolk Church, led the opening worship service.

The financial secretary, Rev. R. E. Brittle, enrolled the members and collected the memberships which amounted to \$2,685.00. Reports were given by the churches aided by the Association. Rev. M. E. Taylor reported for Little Creek, Rev. Melvin Dollar spoke of the progress made at Union, Southampton, and Mr. B. C. Haskett told of the year's progress at Bay View.

Dr. Jesse H. Dollar pointed out that Dr. I. W. Johnson has been a member of the C. M. A. for 51 years and that Mr. C. D. West has been a member for 49 years.

Rev. W. Millard Stevens, minister of The Christian Temple, explained the gift of \$2,500.00 made by the people of the Temple to be used by the C. M. A. to further the work of two of our building projects, namely, Second Church, Norfolk and Bay View. The gift is to be equally divided.

The report on Finance showed a balance on hand of \$8,720.21,

The Rev. W. Millard Stevens, President of the Southern Convention, gave an inspiring message on the topic "Our Home Missionary Opportunity in Eastern Virginia.

Liberty Spring was selected as the place of our 1951 meeting. The following officers were elected for the 1950-51 session: Rev. Stanley Carne, president; Rev. H. E. Crutchfield, vice-president; Rev. Johnson L. Griffin, recording secretary; Rev. R. E. Brittle, financial secretary; Mrs. E. L. Rawles, treasurer.

The material presented by the Resolutions Committee included that we commend the pastor and people of The Christian Temple for their generous gift of \$2,500.00 and heartily recommend that practice to the stronger churches of the Conference that our weaker churches may more easily become selfsustaining. Also, that we request the officers of the C. M. A. to secure names of those in our churches who are able to make special gifts to the C. M. A. and that it be our firm desire to raise \$5,000.00 additional, so as to help our needy churches in their forward work.

The Christian Missionary Association has yet many opportunities to help in building the Kingdom of God in the hearts of men. Let's join our forces together and face the task before us.

We, your Committee, would recommend:

 That we continue to preach Eveagelism from the pulpit.
 That we recommend to our churches Visitation Evangelism as has been successfully used by a number of our churches and that we use that method of Evangelism in our Sunday schools.

3. That we recommend as a method of Evangelism the Pastor's Class for young

people, and a course of preparation for adults.

4. That we strive to assimulate the new members by sponsoring groups.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE FOR MINISTERIAL INSURANCE PLAN.

Your Committee recommends that the Eastern Virginia Conference of Congregational Christian Churches approve the Group Insurance Plan for Ministers as suggested by the Executive Board of The Southern Convention, and that each church be requested to assume its prorata share of the costs of approximately \$49.44 for its minister and that churches desiring to participate pay their premium not later than January 1, 1952.

In case where a minister serves more than one church the cost is to be divided equitably among those churches; and that the funds be collected and dispersed through

The Southern Convention Office at Elon College.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON APPORTIONMENTS.

Your Committee recommends that the apportionment table accepted last year

We recommend that all churches begin early to make regular payments either monthly or quarterly throughout the year until the full apportionment has been paid. We observe that those churches that make an early start in making these payments are usually the ones that come to Conference with a good report.

We commend several of our churches that have over-paid their apportionments for some institutions which help make up for those churches that are negligent in meet-

ing their obligations for the same institutions.

We recommend and strongly urge that our ministers pledge themselves to preach Christian Stewardship more in their churches that the needs of the Kingdom of God may be met.

Our expanding church program with increased cost for carrying on the work of the Kingdom calls for the raising of our apportionment in full as recommended. Let's raise it.

The report of the Committee on Foreign Missions was presented and, pending its adoption, the Rev. Richard L. Jackson, former missionary from The Southern Convention to Shaowu, China, addressed the Conference on the subject, "A World Wide Fellowship."

The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Christian Gospel is a missionary gospel. It represents the most daring enterprise ever let loose in the world. It teaches that God is the Father of all men, and in Christ all are brothers. Wherever the Gospel has gone, it has been rightly received as good news.

The missionary enterprise has proved its worth in the fruits that it has born. It has built colleges, schools, hospitals, churches and good will. The missionaries have provided leadership and carrried with them a high standard of health, cleanliness, and medical care, and a Christ-like Spirit that echoed, "Inasmuch as ye did it unto one of the least of these, my brethren, ye did it unto me."

The life of the world is dependent upon the church, and the life of the church is dependent upon its missions. Dr. Kenneth Scott Latourette speaking on this subject said, "When the question is asked, will Christian Foreign Missions continue, it at once becomes a part of another question: will Christianity continue. If Christianity remains it will inevitably seek to propagate its gospel in other lands. If it ceases to be missionary, it will be because of a fatal loss of conviction in the supporting churches. . . . Given a fundamental lack of enthusiastic conviction, however, and death is certain. In the last analysis, no missionary enterprise, no church. If our faith is false, the race will ultimately ignore it, if we are convinced of its truth, we will certainly propogate it."

The church finds herself today in the midst of a divided world, sick, and in need of the Great Physician. Men are hungry, even unto starvation; men are in bondage, even unto slavery; men are selfish, even unto war. We, as members of the Body of Christ, are called upon to give ourselves, time, talent, and resources to the making of better conditions in the world. Wishing is not enough, placid thoughts are not enough, but drive and sacrifice and a will to work is required of us all. May the mind that was in Christ be in us. May the spirit of Christ anoint us . . "to preach the gospel to the poor . . . to heal the broken hearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised, to preach the acceptable year of the Lord." The challenge is ours through our missionary work! Go ye. . .!

The report of the Home Missions Committee was presented and, pending its adoption, Supt. W. T. Scott spoke on the theme, "The Opportunity

Before Us." Dr. N. G. Newman also spoke to the report. The report was then adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

Your committee notes with grateful appreciation the progressive attitude of many of our rural churches—Holy Neck, Bethlehem, Great Bridge, Union (Southampton), Liberty Spring, Sunbury and Cypress Chapel are now full time pastorates.

We note, however, with deep regret that some rural churches have steadily declined for the past fifty years and may go out of existance if their present regime is continued. Some are too weak in numbers and workers to furnish adequate instruction and worship services. Some are too close to each other to have any need for existance in a day of good roads and fast travel. One group of three churches is within ten minutes drive of each other. Another of the same number is within fifteen minutes drive of each other. We deem it an unwise policy to continue to appropriate mission funds to keep alive churches which have no need of existance. We therefore recommend:

That Conference appoint a committee of ministers and laymen to study the rural church problems with a view to making recommendations as to the advisability of the consolidation of small and weak churches into larger and more efficient units, and that the committee invite the aid of the Board of Home Missions to assist in the project.

We recommend the following appropriations:

That Hopewell Church be granted \$450.00 on the pastor's salary. \$200.00 for the four months ending December 31, 1951 to be paid at once and \$250.00 for the remaining ten months of this Conference year, to be paid quarterly in advance.

That the Sunbury Church be granted \$400.00 to be applied on its parsonage note of \$800.00, to be paid at once.

The report of the Committee on Stewardship was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP.

Some of us have been working diligently in the field of Stewardship for a long time. We have learned that reports to Conference carrying recommendations are of little value. We must find something more pointed. We desire to point out a few facts as they relate to the Eastern Virginia Conference: There are forty-two churches listed. Twenty-four of them are rural, five are in villages, and thirteen are in cities or urban communities. About half of our city churches have well-planned, well executed Every Member Canvasses. Others go through some form, but without the thoroughness the project deserves. Some of our village churches have what is known as an every member canvass, but in most cases, without proper preparation. Perhaps about a half dozen of our rural churches have good canvasses. Most of them have nothing resembling a real every member canvass. How can we overcome this sad situation in the light of the needs of the Kingdom of God? The answer is Stewardship Education.

How can we educate our people? We must begin with our pastors. They are our problem, and yet our brightest prospect. We suggest the following ways to bring the matter into proper focus in every church. If they are followed up, they will bring

startling results:

1. Preach Stewardship sermons at intervals through the year.

Prepare and present Stewardship lessons (one each quarter) in every class and department in the Sunday school. 3. Organize study groups: (a) In prayer meeting, (b) Women's groups, (c) Youth groups, (d) Laymen's groups, (e) Study courses.

4. Procure literature and establish a "literature table" in the church.

5. Present visual aids: (a) Movies, (b) Film strips, (c) Slides, (d) Plays.

Any church that will carry through this program during the year and plan and conduct a good every-member canvass can multiply its ability and program of service.

WEDNESDAY—EVENING SESSION.

Conference was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by President R. E. Brittle. The worship service was conducted by Rev. W. A. Grissom, pastor of the host church, assisted by the Franklin Church choir.

A memorial service for the late Rev. J. Frank Morgan was conducted by Dr. H. S. Hardcastle. A tribute to Mr. Morgan was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS.

Your committee is glad to report that, so far as it knows, death invaded the ranks of the official members of the Eastern Virginia Conference only once during the past year. But it is sorry to report that on that occasion death took from our ranks one of our friendliest and most fruitful ministers, Reverend Joseph Frank Morgan. This report is a tribute to him, and a memorial in his honor.

JOSEPH FRANK MORGAN.

Joseph Frank Morgan was born in North Carolina, and spent his early life there. He attended Sunday school and services of worship at a Christian Church in Moore County, and from his early youth manifested a special interest in religion, and bore witness to his feeling that he had been called to the gospel ministry. So earnest and sincere was he in this feeling, that althought he did not graduate from Elon College until 1914, he was licensed to preach in 1909, and was ordained as an Elder in 1911. His life and labors through the years confirmed the wisdom of the committees of the Conference in licensing and ordaining him at such an early age. No one who knew him would doubt that "there was a man sent from God whose name was Joseph Frank Morgan."

After a brief ministry in his native State, he came to Virginia in 1916 to become pastor of the Berkley Christian Church where he served with zeal for six years. The fact that the membership of the church was doubled in those six years is evidence of his evangelistic spirit which characterized all his ministry. It was while he was pastor at Berkley that he met and won his wife, the former Miss Lula W. Bell, a teacher in the Norfolk School system. She was a worthy helpmate for him, for she had both ability and consecration, and made a great contribution to his ministry by her teaching, her music, and her leadership in woman's work in the church.

After a ministry at Winchester of three and a half years, "Frank," as he was affectionately called, became pastor of the Rosemont Church where he spent nearly nineteen years. It was a long, and honorable, and fruitful ministry, marked by steady increase in membership, progress in physical equipment, and in enlargement of the church program. During this time a new church and educational building were erected and a modern, attractive parsonage was built, and the membership was doubled.

From Rosemont Mr. Morgan went to Second Church, Norfolk, formerly called Old Zion. Ill health caused him to resign his pastorate there after four years service. He became pastor of the Windsor Charge of four churches with high hopes of

regaining his health, and with enthusiasm for the work. But alas, he was stricken by partial paralysis after only six months and was forced to give up his cherished work there. He passed away after a lingering illness of over two and a half years. Like Enoch, he had walked with God, and God took him. He knew whom he had believed, and he was fully persuaded that God was able to keep that which he had committed unto Him against that day.

As a man, Frank Morgan was sincere, honest, friendly, kind and generous. He had a genial spirit and a cheery smile and a hearty laugh. He loved people, and made friends. He loved music, and sang as well as preached the gospel. He tried as a man to live in such a way that "the ministry be not blamed."

As a minister and pastor, Frank Morgan was faithful and fruitful. He was a man of simple and sturdy faith, humble spirit, reverent and devout mind and heart. He believed the Bible to be the word of God and the word of life. He was a man of prayer. He had the evangelistic spirit and the pastoral heart. He exalted Jesus Christ as the Saviour of the world and as the Lord of life. The church was, for him the body of Christ, an institution unique in origin and in mission. He preached the word in season, out of season, and did the work of an evangelist.

As a churchman, Frank Morgan was dependable and expendable. He was at the service of the church, and gave himself for the church. He was appointed and elected to many church and Conference offices and committees, and he served faithfully and well in these spheres of activity, regarding them as sacred trusts. He kept before his people the larger program of the denomination, and enlisted their support in behalf of the Conference and Convention enterprises. He also espoused, and participated in inter-denominational enterprises as a means of making more effective the union of all of Christ's followers.

We the members of your committee hereby express on behalf of the Conference of which he was so long a member, our thanks to God for the life and labors, the friendship and the fellowship of Joseph Frank Morgan. We recommend that a copy of these Memoirs be spread upon the official minutes of this Conference, that a copy be sent to Mrs. Morgan, and that a copy be sent to The Christian Sun for publication.

We suggest that in connection with a brief Memorial Service, the members of the Conference stand in a moment of silent prayer as an expression of our appreciation of Frank Morgan, and as an expression of our sympathy to the members of his family circle.

THURSDAY—MORNING SESSION.

Conference was called to order at 9:30 a.m. by President Brittle. The opening hymn and prayer were led by Rev. C. C. Thomas.

The Laymen's report was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF LAYMEN'S FELLOWSHIP.

The fall rally of the Laymen's Fellowship of the Eastern Virginia Conference was held at the Franklin Congregational Christian Church, Franklin, Va., on November 5, 1950, with over 225 men in attendance. An interesting program was presented and special emphasis was placed on *The Christian Sun*, our Convention paper. About sixty new subscriptions were obtained and the situation concerning our church paper was fully discussed; and it is believed that a deeper appreciation for the publication now exists in the minds of many of the laymen of our Conference. A number of personal contacts have been made; correspondence has been held with leading laymen, and literature has been sent to various churches throughout the Conference in connection with the work of the laymen in our churches and the organizing of Laymen's Fellowship groups in our churches. A number of our churches now have organized such groups and they are rendering a valuable service and impressing upon the men of our churches the need for them to assume a greater responsibility in the work of the church.

The annual fall rally for the Conference this year will be held on Sunday, November 11, at The Christian Temple, Norfolk, Va. A large crowd of laymen from the churches of the Conference is expected. It is thought that the total program of the church can be given a tremendous assist through organized laymen groups, and we are trying to lay the groundwork for greater effort in this direction. Most of our churches recognized Laymen's Sunday on October 21, 1951, by presenting programs by laymen in the churches of our Conference.

The report of The Southern Convention was given by Rev. W. Millard Stevens, president.

The report of the Woman's Missionary Conference was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE EASTERN VIRGINIA WOMAN'S CONFERENCE.

The thirty-ninth annual session of the Eastern Virginia Woman's Missionary Conference of Congregational Christian Churches met on Thursday, October 4, 1951, at the Bethlehem Congregational Christian Church. An interesting program was presented around the theme, "A Highway for Our God."

There were three hundred eighty-one delegates, ministers and visitors present. This attendance was excellent considering the very inclement weather. The spirit of the conference was progressive and inspiring. The financial goal of \$10,000.00 was exceeded, with many societies increasing their apportionments for the ensuing year. A new Constitution and By-Laws was presented. It was adopted as read except for a few minor changes. A revised list of Achievement Goals of the Woman's Missionary Convention was presented and adopted.

The conference considered it a privilege to have three interesting and inspiring speakers to appear on the program. The keynote address was given by Dr. W. W. Sloan, Professor of Bible and Philosophy at Elon College. He described in a very vivid and interesting way the present condition of church work in the Latin American countries, as witnessed by a trip taken by him and his wife last summer. The executive director of the Interracial Department of the Virginia Council of Churches, Mr. Emerson Smith, spoke concerning our work among migrants in Virginia. He told us about the conditions in the various migrant camps in our state and what is being done to help these unfortunate people, who are so necessary to our economy.

The third speaker was our own beloved Mrs. W. B. Williams, speaking on the subject, "Surveying the Highway." She presented in a very charming and informative way the work that the women of the Southern Convention are striving to do to build "A Highway for Our God." Mrs. Williams is the new president of the Woman's Missionary Convention and a member of the Newport News Church.

Our giving amounted to \$10,055.27, of which \$2,170.54 was our Thank Offering which was given to help pay for the renovation of Whitley Memorial Auditorium at Elon College, and \$650 was given for Life Memberships and Memorials which for the last four years have gone to the Timothy Chang Educational Fund. We still have a nice balance in this fund. Timothy has graduated from Duke Divinity School and is enrolled at North Carolina State College at the present time.

Our Mission Study Institutes and the School of Missions were well attended by the women from this conference.

Our theme for the coming year is "A Highway for Our God." We will study "Applied Christianity" as found in the Book of James; our Foreign Mission theme is Latin America, and the Home Mission theme is "Churches for Our Country's Need."

The officers for our conference for 1951-52 are as follows: Mrs. Garland Spratley, president; Mrs. Ray Gordon, vice-president and chairman of Friendly Service; Mrs. H. S. Hardcastle, recording secretary; Mrs. L. W. Stagg, corresponding secretary; Mrs. George Cornell, treasurer.

The departmental superintendents are as follows: Mrs. R. E. Brittle, Young People; Mrs. W. C. Seely, Children; Mrs. R. E. Edwards, Cradle Roll.

The chairmen of standing committees are as follows: Mrs. W. Millard Stevens, Christian Family Life; Mrs. J. H. Duling, Spiritual Life; Mrs. W. H. Johnson, Interdenominational Cooperation; Mrs. W. V. Leathers, Literature; Mrs. E. G. Middleton, Life Memberships and Memorials; Mrs. A. C. Moore, Visual Aids.

District superintendents are: Mrs. J. Everette Neese, Norfolk; Mrs. Ray Gordon, Suffolk; Mrs. G. C. Brittle, Waverly.

The report of the Committee on Social Action was read and, pending its adoption, the Rev. Wayne W. Womer, of Richmond, addresser the Conference, using as his subject "The Work and Service of the Virginia Church Temperance Council." Further recommendations by the Committee on Social Action were presented, and the report was then adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL ACTION.

Again, as in past years, your Committee on Social Action regrets that it can report no real work attempted or accomplished.

I.—It is recommended:

- 1. That the Conference chairman of Social Action be given the names of the chairmen of Social Action in the women's organizations in each of the local churches, that these chairmen may be called together in an attempt to formulate a real plan of action.
- That the pastor of each church secure the names of interested laymen, that discussion groups may be set up in the various areas of our Conference.

Such groups would consider those problems faced by our churches but now ignored by the majority of our fellowship. These problems have to do with inter-denominational action, use of alcohol as a beverage, juvenile and parental delinquency, recreation, etc.

It should be noted that while some of these problems may not receive wide interest in any of our churches, certainly there are individuals in each church who are interested and concerned and willing, therefore, to spend some time in discussion and thought on these problems that make demands upon our churches.

Your Committee on Social Action commends to you the work of the Virginia Church Temperance Council and is happy at this time to present Rev. Wayne W. Womer, executive secretary of the council.

II.—It is further recommended:

Because we believe that Universal Military Training is: (1) A real threat to world peace, since, in a vital sense, it predisposes us to war; (2) Unnecessary because the military needs of this country can be adequately met by the present emergency conscription plan that can be dropped at the conclusion of the emergency; (3) An intolerable burden, financially, for our nation when we are already heavily loaded with military expenditure; (4) Impracticable because the men trained under such a program are not permanently trained, i. e. intensive refresher courses for long periods of time would be required before trainees could be integrated into the military forces; (5) Dangerous to the moral welfare of our nation, because it strikes at the basic unit of the home; therefore,

Be It Resolved:

That the Eastern Virginia Conference of Congregational Christian Churches is strongly opposed to the passage of the proposed Universal Military Training Program in the coming session of Congress or at any other time.

Rev. W. Millard Stevens suggested that a telegram of congratulations be sent to President L. E. Smith upon his twenty years of service to Elon College.

The report of the Historian was read and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF HISTORIAN.

My previous reports have dealt with ministers. This report deals with churches. I have written a history of ten churches: Suffolk, Berea (Nansemond), Oakland, Newport News, Windsor, Union (Southampton), Barrett's, Cypress Chapel, Holy Neck and Franklin. In these, I am cooperating with the Historian of the Convention, who has secured a history of more than thirty of the North Carolina churches. I send my histories on to him, and he types them, has them bound and placed in the fireproof library at Elon College. This has been a very pleasant, yet difficult task. Some of our oldest churches have no records for the first twenty-five or fifty years. Many records have been lost by fire, or sheer carelessness. Some are in a handwriting that can hardly be deciphered. Others are so carelessly kept as to be of little historic value. Some of the neatest and best kept are from fifty to one hundred years old.

- I would, therefore, make the following suggestions and recommendations:
- 1. That churches give more care and thought to the choice of secretaries.
- That churches see that their records are kept in full, neat and accurate form, and available for reference.

- 3. That churches keep their proceedings in one large, substantial record book, instead of a number of small cheap ones.
- 4. That churches endeavor to preserve their records, so far as possible, from loss by fire or other accidental causes.

Your Committee on Religious Literature desires to emphasize the importance of each minister giving as much time as possible to reading the best religious books coming from the press during the present period in addition to reading regularly our own denominational papers—Advance and The Christian Sun—also The Christian Century.

Your committee would also urgently recommend the use of our denomination's Sunday school material in all departments of our Sunday school; and the use of Daily Devotions in all of our congregations.

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The report of the Christian Orphanage was given by Supt. John G. Truitt. He urged the churches to make a liberal Thanksgiving offering to the orphanage.

The report of the Finance Committee was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

We, the Committee on Finance, have carefully examined the records and papers of the Conference Treasurer, Mr. G. C. White, and have found them correct and orderly as usual. We have also verified the balances as shown by the bank statement and have found them correct. We thank Mr. White for his fine work.

We report that the treasurer has received at Conference the sum of \$182.00 for the Conference, and \$288.92 for Convention enterprises, making a total of \$470.92.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

The eighty-second annual session of the Sunday School Convention of Eastern Virginia Congregational Christian Churches was held at the South Norfolk Church,

July 17, 1951. The session was well attended and exceedingly helpful.

The day's session included an address by Dr. D. J. Bowden, dean of Elon College, a forum and group discussions. Dr. Bowden challenged the convention to increased activity through his message, "The Burning Bush." The forum discussed interesting questions relating to Sunday school activity, efficiency and planning. In the discussion groups the problems and plans confronting specific departments in the Sunday school were presented and discussed.

The total receipts of the convention were \$965.00. Of this amount, it was voted that \$750 be paid to the Board of Christian Education, \$50.00 to the Virginia Council of Churches, \$100.00 for Teacher Training Courses in the Eastern Virginia Confer-

ence, and the expense of the secretary.

Officers elected for the coming year were: Floyd A. Turner, president; Rev. H. E.

Crutchfield, vice-president; W. H. Baker, secretary, and Miss Mary Lee Folk, treasurer.

The report of Youth Fellowship was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF YOUTH FELLOWSHIP.

Four important things have happened for our youth in the past year. Three of them are accomplished facts, but the fourth is yet to be done.

The three things that have been done are: First, the winter meeting at Franklin, Virginia. The Rev. Henry Rust, executive secretary of the Department of Youth of the General Council of Congregational Christian Churches, was our speaker and leader. Mr. Rust presented a challenge for our young people to assume their full responsibility in the work of the churches in our Conference. The second was the first of the annual state-wide meetings of our young people. Meeting in Richmond more than 500 strong, we were led by Ken Stokes, president of the National Pilgrim Fellowship, and Warren Matthews, president of our Southern Convention Pilgrim Fellowship. Our young people began to see the tremendous task that they can fulfill. The third meeting was the fall conference at the Suffolk Christian Church where Jose Dabuet, who is the physical part of our Philippine project, was presented to us by Miss Patie Lee Coghill. Jose is studying at Princeton Theological Seminary.

The fourth thing was presented at this meeting. Miss Martha Beggs, state representative of the United Christian Youth Movement (a part of the Virginia Council of Churches), presented to us "The Call to Christian Youth Action." U. C. Y. M., in 1952, hopes to enlist one million young people across our country for greater personal devotion to the way of Christ, greater service to our local church, and greater our reach for ministry to others in other lands. "The Call" can mean much to our local churches if our young people really give themselves to the services it recommended and requires.

During this past year the Youth Fellowship of Eastern Virginia has contributed more financially than it ever has in its history. We exceeded our 1949-50 giving by \$445.00, and we look forward to a new year in which we will again exceed the goals we have set for ourselves.

One important thing should be noted. While the Youth Fellowship expects to assume some financial responsibility, we do not feel that the greatest value lies in the amount of money contributed to any given cause but rather the real value in the fact that we are training an ever increasing group of young people for church leadership and church support. This, to our minds, is the primary function of the Youth Fellowship.

We look on the work of the past year with some pride but with deep humility and with real devotion we look forward to the new year in the hope that we shall accomplish much more in the service of our churches and to the glory of God.

The Executive Committee of the Youth Fellowship wishes to express its deep appreciation for the unselfish service and fine leadership given to our group by Jack Byrd, immediate past-president. It was his vision and untiring effort that made possible to a large degree the successes we have had in the past two years. Even though he was inducted into the U. S. Army during his last year as president, he laid the foundations and helped complete the plans for the work accomplished in the state meeting and for the Philippine project.

- 6. Feeling that the recent action of President Harry S. Truman, in appointing General Mark Clark as Ambassador to the Vatican State is in open violation of the principle of the separation of church and state and contributes to the already confused international situation; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED: That the Eastern Virginia Conference of Congregational Christian Churches, assembled at Franklin, Virginia, November 1, 1951, vigorously protests this appointment, on principle, and that the secretary of the Conference transmit this protest to our representatives in the Congress of the United States, and ask them to vote against this confirmation upon their return to Washington in January, 1952.

WEDNESDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference was called to order at 2:00 by President F. C. Lester. Hymn followed by prayer, Bill Simmons leading.

All churches reported on the progress they had made during the year.

One delegate from each church was spokesman.

The report of the Executive Committee was presented by M. A. Pollard, secretary, and was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Meetings of the Executive Committee of the Western North Carolina Conference were held on December 11, 1950, January 7, 1951, May 25, 1951, and a joint session with the Executive Committee of the Eastern North Carolina Conference at Sanford, N. C. on June 29, 1951. Business transacted by the committee included:

1. The treasurer of conference was authorized to pay to the treasurer of The Southern Convention the amount of \$5.00 (1/3 cost of printing) for certificates of ordination, licensure, and conference ordination.

2. The treasurer of conference was authorized to pay Long and Long, attorneys,

\$152.00, the balance on their account.

3. Secretary of conference authorized to take up with Secretary of State, Hon. Thad Eure, the change in the corporate name of the conference from "The Western North Carolina Christian Conference" to "The Western North Carolina Conference of Congregational Christian Churches."

4. Approved the building of a new church at Antioch (R) as proposed by the church with the understanding that the local church is free to use its property as

it sees fit, so long as it is used for a Congregational Christian Church.

5. Rev. L. M. Presnell to continue work at Siler City with the hope of organizing a church there. A building has been rented for a year beginning June 1, 1951, at a cost of \$100 per month, with the privilege of buying within the first seven months for \$18,500, with rental applied on that amount.

6. Each conference committee may draw on the treasury up to \$10.00 for work

within the conference.

7. We are pleased to report that the Reverends George M. Tally, Eugene Tally, and Clay Ferrell are working cooperatively and in fine spirit. We regret to have to report that Mr. Franklin Pierce of Fuquay Springs, a member of Catawba Springs Christian Church, is now serving churches within the bounds of this conference. He has no ministerial standing with any denomination. It may be that further recommendation will need to be made to this session concerning this matter.

Business Session-Discussion of group insurance was led by Dr. W. T. Scott, and after some discussion by members of Conference, a motion was made that we adopt this policy covering all ordained ministers in good standing in the Conference, and that the churches of the Conference raise for this purpose 16 cents per member per year, this to be added to the regular Conference apportionments now paid by the churches, and sent in through the regular channel of apportionments. This motion was adopted by Conference.

The report of the Committee on Ministry was submitted by Rev. E. Carl Brady, chairman, and was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE MINISTRY.

1. Avery Brown, a member of New Center Church appeared before the committee and stated his desire to preach. We recommend him for membership in the Biblical Class, and that he follow a prescribed course of study for a year.

2. Winfred Bray, a sophmore at Elon and member of Pleasant Grove Church

seeks local licensure, we recommend such licensure for him.

3. Lunnie Burgess, a local conference licentiate appeared before the commit-

- tee, we recommend that his license be continued for another year.
 4. Bill Simmons, a freshman at Elon and member of the Albemarle Church, appeared before the committee, we recommend that he be admitted to the Biblical
- 5. Max Vestal, a Junior at Elon and a member of the Asheboro Church, wishes regular licensure at this session of conference, we so recommend.

6. Gail Brady, a member of Pleasant Grove Church, wishes to be admitted to

the Biblical Class, we recommend such admission.

- 7. Rev. Fred Allred is transferring his field of labor to the North Carolina and Virginia Conference. He wants a letter of transfer to that conference, we recommend that this conference give him this letter.

REV. BEN JOE EARP.

February 12, 1951, Rev. Ben Joe Earp, one of our most beloved ministers, passed from this life unto life Everlasting. Brother Earp was born in Caswell County, April 5, 1888. At an early age he united with the Mt. Lebanon Christian Church. He was a graduate of Elon College and attended Vanderbilt University.

Brother Earp gave to the Congregational Christian Church forty years of his life as a minister, being licensed to preach in 1911 and ordained as an Elder in 1913. He has served churches throughout The Southern Convention and in Georgia. The churches he served were much stronger because of service to them. Three churches secured parsonages during his ministry. He seemed to delight in serving even the smaller churches, but they were blest by his ministry.

During the forty years of his ministry Brother Earp missed only one Southern Convention meeting. This was because of ill health. He grieved because of his absence and said with tears in his eyes, "My heart was there." The conferences in

which he served knew him as a loyal member.

For nearly two years he was bed fast. Though he suffered much he was very patient. Soon after he became ill, he planned his own funeral service, requesting the hymns "My Faith Looks Up to Thee" and "Amazing Grace" be sung. These he said, "Expressed his religious faith." Rightly did the minister say at his funeral,

"He stood up for his Christ, he stood up for his church."

Brother Earp was known as an humble, sincere Christian, churchman, and friend. The world is a better place because he lived. It was a privilege to have known him. His life, his devotion, his high moral standards, are a challenge to all of us. Surely he has heard the welcoming summons, "Enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

WOMEN OF ASHEBORO DISTRICT.

Fifteen of the 38 churches of the Western Conference have active missionary socities. 14 of these are in the Asheboro District. Hank's Chapel is in the Sanford District. The Asheboro District is one of a number of districts which make up the North Carolina Women's Conference. Several conferences then in turn make up the Woman's Convention of The Southern Convention.

The North Carolina Women's Conference meets annually for inspiration, instruction, fellowship, and business. The conference meet this October in Ingram, Virginia. Here our work was reviewed and new plans made for this year's activity. Our district has been following the theme set by the Woman's Convention for the year 1950-51. "Thy Will to Do" proved to be a challenging theme for service

in the work of making Christ known at home and abroad. For our Bible Study we sought to know more about "Great Bible Prayers." For our mission study we learned more about the Near East.

PILGRIM FELLOWSHIP.

The Pilgrim Fellowship of the Western Conference has had a good year. The fifth Sunday Rallies have been well attended and very helpful. Under the fine leadership of Bill Simmons of Albemarle, much has been done to weld our young people of the Conference together.

The first rally was held at Asheboro with a large number of young people and visitors present. Mrs. F. C. Lester led a most impressive candlelight service. This

meeting ws held on the last day of the year.

The next fifth Sunday was a state-wide rally held at Elon College. Several hundred young people from all over the state gathered in Whitley Auditorium for an inspiring service. The national president of Pilgrim Fellowship was present.

The next rally was held at Albemarle with some 250 young people present. The host church gave a most inspiring play, "Simon the Leper." The Albemarle Church later presented the play at Union Grove.

The next rally was held at Shady Grove with another large attendance. Here new officers were elected as follows: Clyde Fields, president, Dolan Tolbert, vice-president; Evangeline Gann, secretary; Frances Sanders, treasurer. Rev. T. D. Sutton, Max Vestal, Bill Simmons, and Mrs. S. H. Pell are counsellors.

Licensing of candidates as recommended by the Committee on the Ministry: Max Vestal, of the Asheboro Church, and Winfred Bray, of Pleasant Grove Church, were licensed by President F. C. Lester for the Conference.

Special music was rendered by the Hank's Chapel Quartet, followed by an address by Dr. Albert D. Stauffacher, on the subject, "About the Witness of Our Churches." Benediction by Rev. Eugene Tally.

THURSDAY—MORNING SESSION.

Conference called to order at 9:30 by President Lester. Prayer led by Rev. Martin L. Fogleman.

Enrollment of additional delegates not registered.

Report on the Elon College Sustaining Fund by Rev. Clyde Fields, chairman. While the report was pending, President L. E. Smith spoke concerning Elon College and the need there. The report was then adopted as follows:

ELON COLLEGE SUSTAINING FUND.

The need for Christian education is more needful now than ever. Secularism has challenged Christianity to a death fight. Christianity needs the support of Christian colleges in checking the inreads of secularism during the formative years spent in securing a college education. The Christian Truths must needs be spoken intelligently and forcefully during the period when other truths bid for supremacy. College years are most important years psychologically, educationally, morally, and spiritually. The Christian undergirding and moral support of a Christian college must not be denied our young people who seek higher education. Elon College, our college, needs our earnest prayers and support.

Our sincere appreciation goes to Dr. L. E. Smith, Dr. William Moseley Brown, members of the faculty, members of the staff, and trustees of the college for fine service rendered.

Our appreciation to churches of the Western Conference who have paid their Dollar-A-Month Sustaining Fund in full or in part. It is to be hoped that all will make efforts to meet this worthy challenge from the college and Convention of One Dollar A Member for Elon.

On motion the report on Nominations was then adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS.

We, your Committee, nominate the following officers for another year:

President-Dr. F. C. Lester.

Vice-President-Rev. Clyde L. Fields.

Secretary-Rev. M. A. Pollard.

Assistant Secretary—Bill Simmons.

Treasurer-Mr. I. L. McDowell.

Laymen's Work-Mr. S. H. Pell, Chairman.

Representatives, North Carolina Council of Churches—W. T. Madren, Cyrus Shoffner.

Representatives, Southern Convention Board—Dr. F. C. Lester, S. H. Pell. Representatives to General Council—Rev. Clyde L. Fields, Cyrus Shoffner.

We recommend the election of all the delegates nominated by the churches. If any churches have failed to nominate delegates we recommend that the Executive Committee elect same.

We recommend the election of a historian for this Conference, and nominate Rev. John Q. Pugh for the place.

We further recommend that the rule of this Conference for a two year term for President be suspended and the Dr. F. C. Lester be elected as president, as we feel the present conditions demand it.

The report of the Committee on Home Missions was submitted by Rev. J. Q. Pugh, chairman. Motion made that Item I of this report be amended to read "Conference Mission fund" instead of "C. M. A. fund." Adopted The report as amended was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

In taking an inventory of the work being done in our Conference for the past two years, there has been much improvement made throughout the Conference. Some churches have built new churches, some have built parsonages and have a full-time pastor. Others have caught the spirit of doing things, but for the lack of available funds have not done what they would like to do.

We are living in a ripidly changing world, and the people of this Conference are to be commended for what has been done. But there is a great need for more to be done. We need more churches built in new fields where there is no Congregational Christian Church.

We have a new church in progress at Siler City. Bailey's Grove has a building fund, and plans are being made for a new church which is so much needed in that fast developing area. Antioch (R) has built a new church. Pleasant Hill church has a committee working on plans for a new Sunday school plant. Their attendance has increased to the extent that they are crowded and need more room.

Your committee finds also that there are a number of churches without a pastor. The statistics for 1950 show that we have 4,200 members in this Conference. In

this fast changing world with things changing so rapidly there is a great need for more funds in order to expand.

Your committee wish to make the following recommendations:

- 1. That each member of the local churches of this Conference be asked to pay \$1.00 per member into the Conference Mission Fund, above the regular C. M. A. membership fee, which will give us around \$4,500.
- 2. Your committee also believes that a field representative would be helpful; therefore we recommend that a field representative be added.
- 3. Due to the shortage of pastors we recommend where it is possible for churches to form a group.
- 4. That pastors urge their churches to pay their Conference Apportionments in full.

JOHN Q. PUGH, Acting Chairman, ERNEST SCOTT, MRS. QUINTON, M. A. POLLARD.

Motion made that recommendation No. 1 of the report, asking for \$1.00 per member, be not included in the statistical table of apportionments for this year. Adopted.

The report of the Committee on Foreign Missions was read by Mrs. E. P. Burroughs, chairman. While this report was pending, an address was given by Dr. Albert D. Stauffacher, his topic being "Our Christian World Missions." The report was then adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Our foreign mission work is one enterprise of our church work that is not understood by many of our church people.

They say, "Why send money and people to foreign lands when we need so much mission work at home?" They also say that only a small per cent of our money reaches the foreign fields. Jesus said, "Go ye into the world and preach the gospel to every creature." Again he said, "Ye shall be my witness unto the uttermost parts of the earth." Could we as Christians do less than obey his commands?

Since we cannot each go ourselves, we can help to send some one else, by giving a part of what God has given us. We can serve God only by serving man. The cost of missionary work has greatly increased. Have you increased your giving? Our missionaries need our prayers. Do we remember them in prayer?

We were delighted to have Rev. Edith Preusse, a missionary of our Board to India, speak in a number of our churches last winter. During this past year Rev. Richard Jackson has presented a picture of our mission work in China both through movies and preaching in several of our churches. Mrs. Richard Jackson spoke in our Asheboro Church. These representatives of our foreign mission work have helped us to see more clearly the needs of the world and how our Board is helping to meet them.

We recommend the following:

- 1. That our pastors preach and teach foreign missions in their churches.
- 2. That our people learn more about our missionaries and mission fields through hearing missionaries speak, and reading.
 - 3. That we study the word of God to learn what he would have us do.

Mrs. E. P. Boroughs, *Chairman*, Mrs. Horace Farlow, W. G. Lamb, Winfred Bray. The report of the Committee on Evangelism was presented by Rev. Clyde Fields, chairman, and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM.

Our world is beset with uncertainty and fear. There is unrest economically, politically, morally, and spiritually. Many voices are raised with messages of hope. Many of the voices have no basis for real hope. Yet many people are giving allegiance to false "messiahs" who promise a way out of darkness. Communism, secularism, and other isms are making disciples due to a promise of hope and a passion on the part of their "missionaries."

Would that Christians could match the passion for disciples that has marked the growth of communism. Would that the devotion to the cause of Christ would surpass the unswerving devotion to the principles of Communism as seen in its adherents. Would we could recapture the enthusiasm and zeal of the early Christian Church. Do we need persecution to stir us out of our lethargy?

The Christian has the message for this dark hour. It is no new ism. It is an old message. It is a powerful message in the hands of a devoted Christian. It is a message that in Christ there is real hope. It is a message that the "Son of Man is still seeking and saving the lost." It is a message that Christ still calls men who walk in darkness and sin to "see a great light." However, the message does not travel in a vacuum, it needs a medium of communication. We, followers of Christ, must indeed be "a light set on a hill." May God grant that our "lamps burn brightly" so that sinners in darkness may find through us "Him who is the Light."

Let us continue seasonal evangelism, Sunday school evangelism, visitation evangelism, personal witness, and other means of winning men to Christ.

THURSDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference called to order at 1:30 by President Lester. Prayer led by Rev. L. M. Presnell.

In the absence of the chairman, L. V. Dorsett, the report of the Committee on Superannuation was read by Mrs. F. C. Lester. The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUPERANNUATION.

Your committee on Superannuation has been rather inactive during the past year. However we have checked the reports of our churches for last year and find that ten out of 38 did not turn in one dime on our Superannuation Fund. We hope that someone in these churches will take time to tell their people just what the money is used for. I am sure that if they knew how happy it makes our retired ministers, and widows of ministers, to receive their checks from this fund they would put forth a greater effort to raise their part of this fund. We would like for our churches to remember our special Christmas offering that goes to our retired ministers. Please take this offering as near Christmas as you can and mail it to our board. We believe the people of our churches have been asked to do only a small thing for our retired ministers and widows, when we think about the years of service they have put in to our churches to help make them what they are today.

We hope that all of our churches will raise the Superannuation Apportionment

in full this year, so that our ministers and widows will not be disappointed when the time comes to receive their pension checks. They did not fail us, let us not fail them.

The report on Stewardship and Apportionments was submitted by Rev. T. D. Sutton, chairman, and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP AND APPORTIONMENTS.

STEWARDSHIP.

Stewardship has many definitions, but here is one that we like: "Stewardship is the management of things and affairs which belong to someone else, with the expectation of improvement." With this definition in mind, we can be sure that God has entrusted the management of our life, our time and our talents that they will become more useful in the building of the Kingdom of God.

We, your committee, realize that we need to become better managers of that which has been entrusted to our care. This calls for the educational side of Stewardship, as to the know-how to become better managers. There was a "Stewardship Clinic" held in Asheboro, October 10, conducted by the Rev. Dr. Jesse Dollar, who did a good job. One such meeting will not be able to teach the "hows" in Stewardship. Therefore, each church needs to be constantly at the job of teaching Stewardship and also needs to designate a certain time each year so there can be special emphasis put on this important matter. Therefore, we make the following recommendations:

1. We recommend that at least one or two months of the year be designated in in each of the churches for the teaching of stewardship.

2. We recommend that during the year each church should order stewardship literature and distribute it to their people.

APPORTIONMENTS.

As we pay our apportionments, we have the privilege of sharing in the on-going of the Kingdom of God among our sister churches and a small part throughout the world.

Our apportionment has eleven children at the present time, and each one needs a share of the money which God has entrusted unto our management. It is the hope of your committee that not one of us would neglect any of these children and fail to give him his proper share of our finance.

Each one of these children of our apportionment is doing an important job in the Kingdom of God. We will not take the time to teil what each one is doing, but we will at this time tell a little about what our Home Missions is doing.

Our own Southern Convention Mission Board, which is receiving financial aid frrom the home mission fund, has and is assisting churches and groups of churches, so as to make it possible for them to have a pastor on their field. In one such group of churches, which the Mission Board has assisted for the last two years, fifty members have been added. To let you know that these churches have been growing toward self-support in those two years is the fact that this group received financial aid from the Mission Board in the amount of \$576 on their pastor's salary the first year, and the second year asked for only \$192, which they received.

Thanks be to our Lord that there are new churches being born into The Southern Convention, and again it is the home mission fund that has played a vital part in this important work.

From these facts, you can see that as you pay your home mission apportionment you have a part in helping your sister churches to have pastors in their fields, a part in receiving new members into other churches, and in helping to erect new churches.

We, your committee, are convinced that if you knew how much good our apportionments have done in the past, how much good they are doing today, and how much good they will do in the future, you would change your minds about apportionments. Instead of "How little can we get by with?" we would all say, "How much more are we able to pay than we have been paying?"

There being a greater need for funds in our Conference, so that the Conference can do a more effective job, we have added an increase of \$115 to our Conference Fund. As you look at your Apportionment Table, we trust that you will accept the little raise that has been allotted to you of this amount.

We recommend that each church pay its apportionment in full, and that each of you go back to your church and make a motion that your church increase your apportionments for the next conference year.

In addition to the regular apportionment, we recommend that each church engage in an effort to raise a minimum average of \$1.00 per member for the Sustaining Fund for Elon College.

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The report on Christian Education was submitted by Mrs. F. C. Lester, chairman. While the report was pending, Miss Pattie Lee Coghill spoke concerning Christian Education and the materials available for the work. The report was then adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

Your committee has had one meeting—January 21, 1951—with two members present. At that time we planned two things: (1) To request the young people of the churches of this Conference to share in their church's program on Elon College Sunday and (2) To have three leadership training schools last spring. The latter were not held as it was impossible to fit them into Miss Coghill's schedule then.

However, your committee is delighted to report that two such schools are now being planned at two of the places we suggested. Seagrove will have a leadership training school beginning on November 11. Pleasant Ridge will have a training school the first week in December. Mr. Sutton and Mr. Fields are being asked to make announcements concerning these schools immediately following this report.

Last year this committee recommended that we work alone six lines in the Mid-Century Advance in Christian Education in this Conference. Let us see if we are making any progress:

- 1. The attitude toward Elon College is definitely more friendly than it used to be in this Conference. This was the first step needed. Students and money are following. We are delighted that three of the students who will be in Elon College this year from this Conference are ministerial students: Winfred Bray, Bill Simmons, and Max Vestal. Reports will show how well we have done in paying our apportionment for Elon College.
- 2. We need to cooperate with the Board of Christian Education and with Miss Coghill in particular. Again reports will show how well we have done in paying our apportionment. Miss Coghill has assisted with the Pilgrim Fellowship Rallies and by working with individual churches. She is planning to teach in our area soon in the two above-mentioned schools.
- 3. Better training of Sunday school teachers is something we need to work on. The goals adopted by the Sunday School Convention call for teacher training in each church each year. We hope the report next year will show great progress in this field. The two schools mentioned above are a good beginning.
- 4. Better support of summer conference and training schools. Here is another area in which we need to work. Too few of our young people attend summer camps. Often when training schools have been set up, few people have attended.
- 5. Vacation Bible Schools are being held in more and more of our churches each summer. Here we are progressing. Pleasant Union was one added to the list this year.
- 6. Use of our own denominational literature is on the increase, rather than the decrease, but the increase is very slow. Pleasant Ridge is planning to begin using it January 1.

We recommend continued work in all of these six fields during the coming year.

The report on the Sunday School Convention was submitted by S. H. Pell, chairman, and on motion received and admitted to record.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

The time has arrived for you to be informed to some extent as to the work that has been done in the Sunday School Convention. This year we tried something new and it was successful—the Superintendents' Meeting. Here we made a study of the

Sunday school, its problems, what it should be doing, how it should be planned, how operated, etc. Please note that there were 22 churches represented.

The annual session of the Sunday School Convention of the Western North Carolina Conference met with the Pleasant Grove Church, July 10, 1951, with 19 churches represented. We were glad to welcome 13 ministers, 11 visitors and 228 delegates, making a total of 252 in attendance.

The theme of The Convention was "The Sunday School in the Light of the Church of Tomorrow." We are sure that those on the program made the day one to remember. It was an inspiration to those of us who were present.

Reports were received from 22 churches and from these reports we see much progress being made in the Sunday school. We note that some of our churches are building new rooms or remodeling, which indicates growth and a community pride.

The Convention has a new committee known as the Planning Committee, the members of which are Rev. Clyde Fields, chairman; Rev. T. D. Sutton, Gillis Luck, W. W. Thomas, Mrs. C. L. Allen, and Mrs. F. C. Lester. Some of the work of this committee should be in the hands of the local church, namely, the standard of excellence. I would like to include in this report the ten goals that they have set up for a standard Sunday school. I feel that if we will at least try to reach these goals we will have a better Sunday school.

- 1. Superintendent begin Sunday school on time with officers and teachers present to assist him.
- 2. Secure average attendance of a least 75 per cent each Sunday and increase enrollment each year.

3. Provide teacher training each yeear.

4. Conduct meetings of officers and teachers each quarter.

- 5. Observe special days: Christmas, Easter, Mother's Day, Father's Day, Children's Day, Promotion Day, and Thanksgiving.
- 6. Attend superintendents' and assistant superintendents' meeting and other helpful meetings.

7. Have a vacation Bible school each year.

- 8. Promote stewardship in the school through testimony, literature, worship, and study.
 - 9. Send required delegates and dues to Sunday School Convention each year.
- 10. Promote the use of The Christian Sun and Advance and study our own Congregational Christian denomination.

We will reach these ten goals if we all work together.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: W. W. Thomas, president, Seagrove; J. J. Riddle, vice-president, Hank's Chapel; Mrs. Orva Brown, secretary, Asheboro; Mrs. Jack Shoffner, assistant secretary, Liberty.

The Pleasant Ridge Congregational Christian Church will be host to The Con-

vention on Tuesday after the second Sunday in July, 1952.

The Committee on Religious Literature did not submit a report.

Chairman J. A. Denton submitted the report on Ministerial and Church Relations, which was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL AND CHURCH RELATIONS.

The vital relationship of all Christians is taught in the Scriptures in these passages: "For as the body is one, and hath many members, and all the members of that one body, being many, are one body, so also is Christ, for by one Spirit are we all baptized into one body, whether we be Jews or Gentiles, whether we be bond or free, and have been all made to drink into one Spirit" (I Cor. 12:12, 13) "And whether one member suffer all the members suffer with it, and one member be honored all the members rejoice with it." (I Cor. 12:26).

We recommend that the pastors and ministers and all Christian workers at all times, and places, and under all conditions, whether visiting in a sister church, in the home, or wherever associated with other Christians, remember effectively the above quotation of teaching, namely, "That we are all members of the body of Christ, and whether one member suffer all the members suffer with it, or one member be honored all the members rejoice with it."

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH GROUPING.

The committee has had two meetings during the year, for the purpose of studying the locations of churches and to hear reports.

We feel that there is a better understanding on what church grouping means throughout the Conference. We commend the churches that have already organized into groups. These are

Seagrove, Ether, Shady Grove.
 Pleasant Ridge, Union Grove, Spoon's Chapel.

3. Sophia, Flint Hill (R), Bailey's Grove.

Randleman and Pleasant Union have been working together. The new work at Siler City has been in connection with the Liberty Church. If the reports to your committee are correct, we have within the Conference four full-time churches: Albemarle, Asheboro, Hight Point, Pleasant Hill. We have three organized groups, Seagrove, Pleasant Ridge and Sophia, all having parsonages, with pastors living in the field. Randleman, Hank's Chapel, and Liberty each have parsonage and the pastor lives on the field. There are other churches considering building parsonages.

We believe the progress of our Conference depends very much on the church people working together with their own church and also working together with other churches, and forming groups when possible so that pastors can live in the field. They could thus render a much greater service and this would solve much of the problem of churches being without pastors.

There are some churches now on half time and several small rural churches that could be set up in groups if they would get together. Therefore we make the following resolutions:

1. That pastors in every church take this matter up with their people for study.

2. That there be a committee from each church to study and work with the other

3. That laymen, women's missionary societies, young people's groups, set aside some time during the year to discuss the possibility of grouping.

4. That you call on your Conference committee whenever you think they can be

The report on Moral Reform, Mrs. B. P. Moffitt, chairman, was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM.

We, your Committee on Moral Reform, believe that if such a committee has a real place in our church program it should, when accepted by the Conference receive active as well as passive acceptance; that its recommendations, when adopted, should be exercised rather than merely given space in our church record.

We believe that these reports should include reports of the past year's activities as well as recommendations for the following year's work. Inasmuch as we truly believe that the church has a most vital responsibility in the moral condition of the world, we recommend:

1. That our church as a whole show more active concern over the social problems of our day, and that each local church in its own way work to correct or improve moral conditions in its particular community.

2. That a report of such action and success—small or great—be made available to the Committee on Moral Reform to be included in the committee's report for 1952.

3. That we as representatives of the various churches in our Conference resolve to take more seriously than ever before the recommendations presented by the committee; accepting and doing our best to carry out those which we deem beneficial, and striking out those which we consider worthless or impractical.

The Finance Committee has examined the Treasurer's Report and finds the same to be correct.

We leave it in the hands of the Executive Committee of Conference to recommend such payments of funds and expenses as are customary for Conference to pay.

On motion this report was adopted. The Treasurer's Report was then adopted.

The report of the Committee on Resolutions was submitted by Rev. W. T. Madren, chairman. This report was taken up item by item and voted as such. The report was then adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

We recommend:

- 1. That we extend our appreciation to the pastor and people of the Hank's Chapel Christian Church for the fine way in which they have entertained Conference, by a rising vote of thanks.
- 2. That we extend our appreciation to Dr. Albert D. Stauffacher for his inspiring and challenging messages that he has brought us, and also to the Convention officials, President Stevens, Dr. Truitt, Dr. Smith, Dr. House, for the messages and information they have brought us regarding our Convention and its institutions.
- 3. That we commend the Program Committee for the fine program of this 81st session of the Western North Carolina Conference, and also Dr. F. C. Lester for the marvelous way in which he presided as chairman and the officers for their marvelous spirit of cooperation and the work they have done toward our Mid-Century Advance.
- 4. That the Executive Committee be authorized to study the possibilities of a Conference radio program, and, if it is found to be advisable and possible, that a radio commission to be set up to advise and be responsible for said program.
- 5. That we commend Brother Presnell and his co-worker, Winfred Bray, for the fine work they are doing at Siler City in the organization of a church there. We further recommend that work be continued there beyond May 31, 1952, if advisable, and that the Executive Committee continue with the work in the way that they deem advisable.
- 6. Whereas, we belive in the separation of church and state, and are so guaranteed this right by the constitution of the U. S., and whereas an appointment of an ambassador to the Vatican would be a violation of this right and a violation of the spirit of religious freedom guaranteed us by the constitution:

Be it resolved that the 81st session of the Western North Carolina Conference go on record as opposing the appointment of an ambassador to the Vatican and that letters be sent to President Truman and Senators Clyde Hoey and Willis Smith expressing our view regarding said appointment. And that members of our churches be urged to write similar letters to our Senators.

7. Whereas, the proposed program of Universal Military Training is a violation of our American democratic way of life and contrary to Christian principals; thereas the proposed UMT would indoctrinate, unecessarily, our young men and would tend to convert our country to a militaristic state and thus undermine our democracy; and whereas heretofore our military forces have been adequately supplied by Selective Service Systems:

Be it resolved that this session of Conference go on record as opposing the proposed UMT, and a letter be sent to President Truman and Senators Clyde Hoey and Willis Smith expressing our view, and that members of our churches be urged to write similiar letters to the N. C. Senators.

8. We recommend that the Executive Committee approve unread minutes of the Conference and that the minutes be mimeographed and sent to ministers and churches of this Conference at Conference expense.

The Executive Committee of Conference was authorize by vote of Conference to have the Minutes of this session mimeographed and sent to all churches of Conference.

The flowers bought and used for the memorial service to Rev. Ben Joe Earp were by vote of Conference sent to the family of the deceased with our sympathy.

Motion made to have minutes printed in THE ANNUAL and we purchase 150 copies. This motion was amended to purchase 150 copies if ready by March 15, otherwise the number of copies to be reduced to 75. Motion adopted.

Motion adopted directing the secretary of Conference to send a letter to each of the ministers who were unable to attend Conference: Dr. G. O. Lankford, Revs. D. R. Moffitt, T. J. Green and Park W. Fisher.

The secretary and president of Conference were authorized by vote of conference to complete the minutes of this session.

The closing devotional service was led by Dr. Albert D. Stauffacher, who closed the final session with prayer.

Adjourned to meet on Wednesday and Thursday after the first Sunday in November, 1952, at a place to be selected by the Executive Committee.

The report of the Executive Committee was presented as follows:

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

We, your Executive Committee, gave approval, on January 22, 1951, to the Greensboro, Palm Street Church, to borrow \$20,000 from the Gate City Savings and Loan Association to complete their building program. A copy of the resolution is as follows:

Be It Resolved by the Executive Committee of the North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference in session on this the 22nd day of January, 1951, that the Palm Street Congregational Christian Church be and is hereby authorized to borrow from Gate City Savings and Loan Association the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars, and that the officers of this Conference be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to execute deed of trust on the church property, to-wit, the same property that is described in deed of trust recorded in Book 1359, at page 104 et seq., office of Register of Deeds of Guilford County, N. C., in the sum of \$20,000.00, and also to execute note to accompany said deed of trust, all of said papers to be in form as required by said Association; and out of the proceeds of said loan the officers of said Palm Street Church are authorized, empowered and directed to pay to said Gate City Savings and Loan Association the balance due on the present \$10,000.00 deed of trust and cause the same to be cancelled of record; and said Association is authorized and empowered to pay the net proceeds from said loan to the proper officer or officers of said Palm Street Church and said Association will not be charged with responsibility for application of the proceeds from said loan; and the officers of this Conference and the officers of said Palm Street Church are authorized, empowered and directed to subscribe to stock in said Association and to pledge insurance on said property, and to agree to payments on stock in said Association and re-payments on said loan in such manner and upon such terms as the said Association may require; and said officers of this Conference and of said church are authorized and empowered to do any and everything necessary in the premises or required by said Association to effectuate said loan.

Andes, Secretary of the North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference, do hereby certify that the foregoing is an exact and true copy of a resolution duly adopted by the Executive Committee of the North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference at a meeting held on the 22nd day of January, 1951, at Elon College, North Carolina, which meeting was attended by a quorum of the members of said Committee and was regularly called and held.

Know All Men by These Presents that the North Carolina and Virginia Conference of the Congregational Christian Churches in session at Shallow Ford Congregational Christian Church, near Elon College, North Carolina, on November 15, 1950, after consideration and discussion of the proposed sale of the real property belonging to the Trustees of The First Congregational Christian Church in Lynchburg, Virginia, approved and consented to the sale of the said Lynchburg, Virginia, Church Property to the Trustees of Chestnut Hill Methodist Church of Lynchburg, Virginia, upon condition that from the proceeds of such sale, said North Carolina and Virginia Conference be paid the sum of Eleven Thousand and no 100 (\$11,000.00) Dollars in cash for its

equity and interest in the said church property, and that at said session of said Conference, the Executive Committee of the North Carolina and Virginia Conference of the Congregational Christian Churches was duly authorized and empowered to act for the Conference in giving consent for such disposition of said property in accordance with Chapter 3 of Part II of the Manual of the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, and that said Executive Committee pursuant to such authorization executes this instrument.

Now, Therefore, the said North Carolina and Virginia Conference of the Congregational Christian Churches, acting by and through its Executive Committee, as aforesaid, doth hereby consent to the sale of the church property, title to which is vested in the Trustees of the First Congregational Christian Church of Lynchburg, Virginia, to the Trustees of Chestnut Hill Methodist Church of Lynchburg, Virginia, provided and upon the condition that the sum of Eleven Thousand and No 100 (\$11,000.00) Dollars in cash be paid to the Executive Committee of said Conference in payment for its interest and equity in said church property.

In Testimony Whereof, the said Executive Committee of the North Carolina and Virginia Conference of the Congregational Christian Churches, which committee is composed of S. C. Harrell, Thurman F. Bowers and W. J. Andes, hath executed this indenture by each of the members of said Executive Committee setting his hand and seal hereto.

- It was moved and voted that our attorney have the check for \$11,000.00 drawn to Russell V. Powell, Treasurer, the North Carolina and Virginia Conference of Congregational Christian Churches.
- 3. It was moved and voted that Russell V. Powell, Treasurer, the North Carolina and Virginia Conference of Congregational Christian Churches, be authorized to remit the money received from the sale of the Lynchburg Church property to the Treasurer of the Mission Board of the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, and that we ask the Mission Board to allocate the Conference's pro-rata share of said proceeds to the benefit of the churches of this Conference.

On March 12, 1951, we also approved the following recommendation of the Committee on the Ministry:

We, your Committee on the Ministry of the North Carolina and Virginia Conference, recommend that Rev. Edgar J. Clawson, pastor of Long's Chapel Congregational Christian Church and an ordained minister of the Christian Missionary Alliance Church, be received as a Conference ordained minister on the condition that he enroll at Elon College at the winter quarter, 1951, and pursue his studies to graduation, and that the Ministerial Scholarship Fund make a grant of \$100.00 per year for his school expenses.

On March 12, 1951, after having received a letter from the Calvary Christian Church in Greensboro desiring membership in the North Carolina and Virginia Conference of Congregational Christian Churches, it was moved and voted that the Calvary Church of Greensboro be received and enrolled in the North Carolina and Virginia Conference of Congregational Christian Churches and that Dr. W. E. Wisseman, Dr. W. T. Scott, Rev. W. J. Andes and the pastor, Rev. T. F. Bowers, be the committee to arrange for a "Service of Recognition" of the church's entrance into the Conference.

This service was held April 8, 1951, at 8 p.m., with 12 of our churches being represented by delegates and 11 churches sending greetings by letter.

On April 9, 1951, your Executive Committee voted the following Biblical Class

- 1. That Sammy Nelson, of LaGrange, Georgia, be enrolled in the riche Ministry of this Conference upon the recommendation of the Committee on t.d. and upon a letter of recommendation from Dr. David W. Shepher Christian
- 2. That Herman Johnson, a member of the Calvary Congregational inference Church in Greensboro, be enrolled in the Biblical Class of this Congletter upon the recommendation of the Committee on the Ministry and upon of recommendation from Rev. T. F. Bowers.
- 3. That we approve the recommendation of the Committee on the Ministry tion the licensure of Mr. John Graves, deleting the portion of the recommendatus of the committee which reads, "with view to ordination as a minister of ecocation."

It was the view of the Executive Committee that it was not in a position to com-d mit the Conference to ordination on the condition apecified, except upon the approval to of the Conference in session. Mr. Graves was licensed July 6, 1951, at Elon College, in N. C.

May 14, 1951, your committee approved the recommendation of the Committee on the Ministry to ordain Bland A. Leebrick to the full gospel ministry on Sunday, June 3, 1951. Those serving on the ordaining presbytery were: D. J. Bowden, L. E. Smith, W. T. Scott, W. E. Wisseman and S. C. Harrell.

Also on May 14, 1951, we approved the recommendation of the Committee on the Ministry that a letter of transfer of ministerial standing be granted Rev. James B. Allan to the Naugatuck Valley Association of the Connecticut Conference.

Your committee, after having received a letter from the Beverly Hills Community Church, Burlington, N. C., stating their desire to have membership in this Conference, voted, June 29, 1951, the reception of said church to membership in this Conference.

On page 141 of the 1950 ANNUAL, the secretary of the Conference was asked to drop the Ivy Hill Church from the roll of churches in the Conference if no organized church were found there. Your secretary, under the advisement of the Executive Committee and the pastor of the Carroll County churches in Virginia, has dropped the Ivy Hill Church as of this conference session.

The changing of the name of the Conference, as recommended by your Executive Committee last year, has been hindered somewhat by technical legal difficulties. This matter will be continued for further investigation and consideration.

The Committee on Budget and Apportionments presented the first reading of its report.

Supt. W. T. Scott presented the "Proposed Group Insurance Plan" for pastors, full-time church employees and their dependents.

The plan for pastors is as follows:

How Plan is to be Financed.

It is suggested that the Conference pay the pastor's total costs at the rate of approximately \$49.44 per pastor by providing a Conference Insurance Fund per capita in the apportionments, amounting to 13 cents per member. This is based upon a membership of 10,193, which at 13 cents per member will provide a fund of \$1,325.06. There are 25 pastors, at \$49.44, requiring the sum of \$1,236.00.

The Conference voted unanimously to adopt the plan for pastors and referred the plan to the Committee on Budget and Apportionments for inclusion in the Conference Fund of the apportionments. The part of the plan referring to full-time church employees and dependents of ministers was left to the individual person or church for action.

The report of the Committee on the Ministry was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE MINISTRY.

We, your Committee on the Ministry, are deeply concerned over the shortage of ministers, both in this Conference and the Convention as a whole. The number of young men entering the ministry today in our church is on the decrease. Our churches and pastors should seek by all possible means to encourage some of the young men in our churches to consider the ministry as their life work. Let us pray earnestly that the Lord may call forth from our own fellowship worthy preachers of the Gospel.

We offer the following recommendations relative to ministerial personnel:

- 1. Brother Julius Rice, a senior at Elon and pastor of Monticello and Hines Chapel churches, is doing a fine piece of work, both at Elon College and in his churches. It is recommended that his licensure be continued.
- 2. Brother Allen Hurdle has accepted a call to the Holy Neck pastorate in Eastern Virginia and requests a letter of transfer for his ministerial standing. It is recommended that he be granted a letter of transfer from this Conference to the Eastern Virginia Congrgational Christian Conference.
- 3. Brother Clyde Koon, now serving Salem Chapel and Belew Creek churches in this Conference, requests that his ministerial standing be transferred from the Valley of Virginia Conference to this Conference. It is recommended that he be received and enrolled as an elder in this Conference.
- 4. Brother John Bowers has been working as a supply pastor under Brother Thurman Bowers' supervision. Brother Bowers is an ordained elder in the Nazarene Church, but would like to become a recognized minister in our church. He has been called to Smithwood, a church in the Western North Carolina Conference, but is withholding his acceptance of this call until he is a recognized minister in our church. It is recommended that he be granted a Conference licensure, provided he follow a prescribed course of study outlined by this committee, and that he continue to work under the supervision of Brother Thurman Bowers and Dr. W. T. Scott. We request that his standing be recognized in the Western North Carolina Confer-
- 5. Brother Warren Matthews is a senior at Elon College and is doing a most commendable job in his studies. He worked with Rev. Fred Register in the Eastern North Carolina Conference this past summer. He did considerable preaching this past summer and engaged in many other church activities. It is recommended that his licensure be continued.
- 6. Brother John R. Lackey is a student at Duke Divinity School, fulltime pastor at Apple's Chapel, and is making his home at Elon College. Reports on his work both at Duke and in his parish are most encouraging. He is doing a good job. It is recommended that his standing of Conference Ordination be continued.
- 7. Brother William Rich is a student at Duke Divinity School and pastor of Damascus and Morrisville Churches. He requests that he be granted a Conference Ordination. He seems to be getting along well with his studies and pastorial work. It is recommended that he be given a Conference Ordination.
- 8. Brother Herman Johnson is a freshman at Elon College and has been teaching a Sunday school class at Zion for some time. He has expressed his desire to enter the ministry. It is recommended that he be enrolled in the Biblical Class.
- 9. Brother Rosser Lee Clapp is a senior at Elon College and pastor of our Meban Church. He requests that he be ordained after he has completed his work at Elon. He is to be commended for the work he is doing. It is recommended that his licensure be continued.
- 10. Brother John Perry Littiken is a freshman at Elon College and working at Western Electric. He was a member of Turner's Chapel Church near Sanford for several years and did some teaching and preaching while there. He has expressed his desire to make the ministry his life work. We recommend that he be enrolled in the Biblical Classs.
- 11. Brother Harold Loman, who is a minister of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and pastor of Hopedale, a church in this Conference, appeared before this Committee requesting that he be received by transfer into the ministry of the North Carolina and Virginia Conference with a Conference Ordination standing. Your Committee did not feel it could approve this request. It was voted that the matter should be referred to the Executive Committee of the Conference asking them to take appropriate action in accordance with the action of the Executive Committee reported to the 1949 session of Conference and recorded on page 79 of the 1949 ANNUAL.

- 12. Timothy Chang a graduate student at State College and a member of our Durham Church, came to us requesting that he be licensed at this session of Conference. We have a letter from the Durham Church making this same request. Timothy is also a graduate of Duke Divinity School. It is recommended that he be licensed at this session of Conference.
- 13. Brother Lester Stanley is the pastor of our church at Gibsonville and is doing a most commendable job. The work there is progressing and the spirit of the church is most encouraging. He comes to us requesting a Conference Ordination. We have a letter from his church signed by the board of deacons making this same request. It is recommended that he be granted a Conference Ordination and that he follow a prescribed course of study set up by this Committee.

14. Brother Percy Ricketts was pastor of Mt. Bethel, Kellam's Grove and New Lebanon Churches for several years, and is now pastor of Lakewood Community Church near Danville. The Lord has richly blessed this man's ministry. He is doing a fine piece of work. It is recommended that his Conference Ordination be continued.

- 15. Brother William T. Scott, Jr., a licentiate in this Conference, is serving this year as assistant pastor of the First Congregational Church of Norwich, N. Y. He expects to return to Yale Divinity School in the fall of 1952. We recommed that his licensure be continued.
- 16. It is recommended that Brother 1. T. Underwood be continued as a licentiate for another year.
- 17. Brother W. P. Tolly is now a student at Hartford Seminary. It is recommended that he be continued in the Biblical Class.
- 18. Brother John Graves is now a student at Hartford Seminary. It is recommended that he be continued as a licentiate.
- 19. Brother Staley Sorrell is a college ministerial student. It is recommended that he be continued as a member of the Biblical Class.
- 20. Brother Mullen C. Morricle failed to report to your committee this year. It is recommended that he be discontinued as a member of the Biblical Class.
- 21. Brother Orville H. White is now serving as minister of the Tryon Church. It is recommended that he be received and enrolled as a member in full standing when his letter of transfer is presented to the Executive Committe.
- 22. Brother Frank E. Ratzell is now serving as a minister of the Asheville Church. It is recommended that he be received and enrolled as a member in full standing when his letter of transfer is presented to the Executive Committee.
- 23. Brother James C. Perkins, of Durham, requests that his ministerial standing be transferred to this Conference from the Texas Association of Congregational Christian Churches. We have his letter of transfer and we recommend the acceptance of his ministerial standing as an elder in this Conference.

Mrs. H. E. Robinson, chairman of the Committee on Religious Literature, made an oral report emphasizing the need of better and more religious reading. Dr. R. L. House, editor of *The Christian Sun*, urged the reading of this paper.

The report of the Committee on Foreign Missions was presented as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The distinction between home and foreign missions is growing less each year. We are coming to recognize that our gospel is for one world and to be proclaimed

to God's children everywhere. However, for administrative purposes the missionary enterprize is divided between home and foreign, the latter being the special con-

cern of this committee.

Our giving to foreign missions has held up well in comparison to other years. However, when it is compared to our numbers and our resources it is far too little. We have in the neighborhood of 10,000 members in this conference. Last year we gave a little better than $\frac{1}{3}$ of a cent per day per member for the propagation of the gospel in other lands. If we gave a sum as little as one cent per day per member we could raise \$30,000 instead of the present level of around \$12,000 per year.

Our Christian World Mission is a reflection of our concern for our fellow man. The extent to which we give our support is the evidence of our real interest regardless of our professions. Neglect, indifference, and preoccupation with other demands explain our small response. Ways must be found to stimulate thought and action toward the foreign fields. Great opportunities await our response in Japan, India, Latin America, Africa, and the isles of the sea. At this writing forty-five candidates are being sought to fill mission posts of the American Board. Our established missions are operating on shoe-string budgets.

Your committee urges every cooperation with our national and convention boards as they plan ways of undergirding the outreach of the church. Pray for our missionaries. Do your part in making our people aware of their work and their needs. Finally, give of your sons and daughters and your substance that our day may see

the advance and not the retreat of God's Kingdom across the earth.

Conference adjourned for lunch, and Dr. W. M. Brown gave the closing prayer and pronounced the blessing for the meal.

TUESDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference reconvened at 1:30 p. m.

The song and prayer were led by W. P. Smith.

Dr. J. G. Truitt, superintendent of the Christian Orphanage, presented the needs of that institution.

Mrs. S. L. Mauldin, vice-president of the North Carolina Woman's Conference, presented the following report:

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA WOMAN'S CONFERENCE PRESIDENT.

The women's groups in local churches of the North Carolina Woman's Conference are in the majority concentrating on missions in their study, worship, and giving. However, a few groups do not concentrate on missions and some are divided between missions and ladies' aid to the church.

In the past year, we have given a total of \$8,969.89, which, after expenses are deducted and special funds are properly disbursed, is divided equally between home

and foreign missions.

During the past year, we have studied "Great Prayers of the Bible" for our devotional study. Our mission studies were "Toward a Christian Community" and "The Near East."

The District Rallies were held this past spring, with Mrs. E. E. McClintock and Rev. R. L. Jackson as guest speakers. Both were very helpful and inspiring.

The School of Missions was held this summer at Elon, with the following speakers: Mrs. F. C. Lester, Miss Lucy Steele, Miss Ione Catton, and others.

For this year, we are studying the Book of James, Latin America, and "Churches for our Country's need." Our Thank Offering goes to Japan International Christian University, and the return from the Life Memberships and Memorials fund goes to help renovate Franklinton Center.

Our fall conference was held at Ingram Church, with several interesting speakers making an integrated program. The offering for the day, about \$80.00, went to help North Carolina Migrants in the program sponsored by the North Carolina Council of Churches.

Our theme for this year is "A Highway for our God."

MRS. W. J. ANDES, President.

The report was admitted to record.

Rev. Morton R. Kurtz, executive director of the North Carolina Council of Churches, presented the work of that body.

The report of the Committee on Christian Education was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

- 1. The Young People of our conference have a new president, Curtis Young of Durham. They have promoted and held a State-wide Youth Rally, last April, at Elon College. 600 young people were there. Another state meeting is to be held next spring. This past October a conference-wide youth meeting was held at Apple's Chapel. They have given their share in the Philippine project and will do so next year.
- 2. The North Carolina and Virginia Sunday School Convention was held at New Lebanon, June 28, 1951, with a good attendance and with good reports. Mr. A. H. Blalock is the president of this group.
- 3. Leadership Training Schools have been held at Greensboro and Burlington, with surrounding churches participating. Schools are now planned for these same areas for January, 1952. We urge other schools to be set up.

A new training school was the meeting of the Superintendents of the Sunday schools at Reidsville last March 15. This was well attended and an excellent training period was held for the leaders of our Sunday schools. More meetings of this sort will be held for our leaders and one is now being planned for next spring.

- 4. Elon College, our own church college, is desperately in need of our support now. Faced with decreased enrollment and therefore decreased income from students, we in the church are called upon to support the college with our Sustaining Fund as well as with our regular college apportionment.
- 5. Your committee on Christian Education has thus been active in setting up training schools and helping our churches to face the future with the best equipped leadership possible.

The report of the Committee on Home Missions was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS AND RURAL CHURCH.

During the past year, some progress has been made within our conference. We would like to commend Kallam's Grove, New Lebanon, and Mt. Bethel for the forming of a pastorate. They have formed this pastorate and provided an adequate salary and a parsonage for their pastor and his family. Perhaps more of our churches need to follow their example. We also would like to commend the Burlington area for the work that has been done there. The Beverly Hills Congregational Christian Church is now organized and functioning. During the year, the parsonage for the Beverly Hills Church was built by the Southern Convention Mission Board.

This committee makes the following recommendations to this conference:

- 1. That a survey should be conducted in South Boston, Virginia, as to the possibility of locating there a Congregational Christian Church. We would enlist the help of the Conference Missionary Association in carrying out this project.
- 2. That churches in the Greensboro, Reidsville, Danville, Durham, and Winston-Salem areas be urged to see if there is need for additional churches of our denomination in their vicinity. If there is such a need we would recommend that they take the leadership in establishing these churches.
- 3. That \$3,000.00 plus a parsonage be the minimum salary for a minister living on the field and giving full time to his church work.

It was moved and carried that the report of the Committee on Nominations be adopted and that the secretary be instructed to cast the ballot of Conference for the nominees. The secretary cast the ballot as directed, and the president declared the officers elected.

It was moved and carried that the Executive Committee be authorized to confirm the nominations of the churches for delegates to the Southern Convention.

It was moved and carried that the Nominating Committee be a "standing committee" of the Conference, such a committee to be named at the close of the Conference.

Conference adjourned for the evening meal.

TUESDAY—EVENING SESSION.

Conference reconvened at 7:30 p.m.

The evening worship service was conducted by Rev. T. G. Humphries, pastor of the host church, and the youth choir of the church.

The report of the Committee on Laymen's Fellowship was presented as follows:

REPORT ON LAYMEN'S FELLOWSHIP.

The North Carolina and Virginia Conference Laymen's Fellowship is one of the five Conference units in the Southern Convention Laymen's Fellowship. Our Conference is represented on the Laymen's Council (or Executive Committee) of the Southern Convention Laymen's Fellowship by J. H. Rountree, of Greensboro, and S. L. Mauldin, of Winston-Salem, N. C.

During the past year two meetings have been held of our Conference Fellow-ship—one in Burlington in the winter, and one in Durham in the spring. These meetings were well attended, and considerable enthusiasm was manifested.

Laymen's Sunday was observed on October 21 and many of our churches observed the day with Laymen in charge of the church services.

The Laymen of the Conference and Convention are taking a larger place in the work of our church, but as yet, we have not made ourselves felt as greatly as we are capable of doing. We believe the Laymen need to undertake some specific job. Our Laymen's Council, meeting in September, made some recommendations that ought to be adopted by us.

The Laymen's Council recommended that the Laymen support the Sustaining Fund for Elon College of \$1.00 per member per year.

The Council further recommended that the Laymen's Fellowship accept the physical development of Moonelon, a conference site of 25 acres, given to the Convention just three-quarters of a mile from Elon College. Now on the property are a large swimming pool, a lake and two houses. This site offers an excellent opportunity for developing a center for our Youth summer Conferences and for various other groups of our church. Many other denominations already have such cen-

ters, and we shall be able to promote our work in a larger way if we will get behind this undertaking. The need now is for a central dining room which would be used for an administration building, and also ten or a dozen cabins. The Laymen's Council recommended that the Laymen undertake to raise \$25,000 for the purpose of developing Moonelon. Since the center is located in our Conference, our churches would perhaps benefit more largely than any other Conference. We ought to challenge the other Conferences by generous financial support of this worthy undertaking.

When the Laymen were organized four years ago, we did not have a Conference organization, and they were set up by the Southern Convention Laymen's Fellowship. The time has now come when the Laymen of this Conference ought to elect their own officers. At this session we ought to elect a chairman, a vice-chairman and a secretary-treasurer. We ought to nominate also two representatives to the Southern Convention Laymen's Council.

I would like to call to your attention the sixteen Laymen's Fellowship objectives and projects. It is hoped that the Laymen's Fellowship may grow in power during the coming year.

Laymen's Fellowship Objectives and Projects.

- 1. A working organization and unit of men in every local church.
- 2. A father and son banquet in each local church or district.
- 3. Annual fellowship visitation on some Sunday or during some week in each local church.
- 4. Observance of Laymen's Sunday in every church with the Laymen participating in a special service.
 - 5. Churchmanship Institutes for deacons and church officers.
- 6. Better business organization and administration in the work of the local church.
 - 7. Promote subscriptions to The Christian Sun.
 - 8. Maintain private and family devotions, Bible reading and prayers.
- 9. Regular attendance at church, Sunday school, Conference, and Convention meetings, and encourage others to do so.
- 10. Encourage and promote better financial support of the local church, Conference and Convention enterprises.
 - 11. Encourage adequate salaries for pastors.
 - 12. Improvement of church property.
- 13. Sponsor one or more social fellowship meetings in the local church during the year.
- 14. Support the Convention goal for evangelism—one new member per month per 100 members in every local church.
- 15. Support the Convention goal for church extension—one new church in each Conference per year.
 - 16. Encourage and practice Christian principles in earning and using money. Motto: "Every Laymen Working in his Place in his Church."

Pending the adoption of the report, the following panel presented the work of the laymen in the church: Geo. D. Colclough, J. R. Walker, Ben Fort, Herman Truitt and Wm. Oakley.

The report of the Committee on Laymen's Fellowship was adopted.

By authority of the vote of Conference in adopting the report of the Committee on the Ministry, the president of the Conference licensed Timothy Chang, member of the Durham Church and of the church in Shaowu, China, and John Bowers of the Calvary Church in Greensboro, as probationers to preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Rev. R. L. Jackson led the prayer.

By authority of the vote of Conference in adopting the report of the Committee on the Ministry, the ordaining presbytery, W. E. Wisseman as

chairman, ordained William A. Rich of the Graham Proidence Memorial Church and J. Lester Stanley of the Gibsonville Church to Conference ordination. Rev. W. W. Snyder presented the candidates, Rev. M. W. Andes led the ordaining prayer, Dr. W. T. Scott delivered the charge, and Rev. T. G. Humphries presented the Holy Bible.

Conference adjourned with J. Lester Stanley pronouncing the benediction.

WEDNESDAY—MORNING SESSION.

Conference called to order at 9:30 a.m. by the president. The hymn and prayer led by Rev. John R. Lackey. The minutes of Tuesday's sessions were read and approved. The enrollment of ministers and delegates was completed. The report of the Committee on Stewardship was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP.

Stewardship is the Christian life in practice. It is a way of life based upon the operational principle of the universe, i. e., that the harvest is many fold greater than the planting in every case where man works in harmony with God. Stewardship is essential to the growth and development of the Christian Church.

The very fact that we are members of the church is an indication within itself that we have subscribed to the teachings of the Bible upon which our church is built. Therefore, we believe in the command of Christ to preach the gospel to all mankind. If this is to be done, we must provide workers and funds with which to do the job. We must learn to be stewards of God, not only in the giving of a portion of the income we receive, but also by giving a portion of our time to the work of the church. It is the conviction of the Steward that God is the Owner of all things and that man is no more than trustee of that little portion over which he is granted control. Therefore he follows the practice of laying aside a proportion of all his earnings as the first call upon his substance. He uses that proportion for the church before he meets the other obligations of life.

Experience has taught us that where an individual tithes, the tither and the cause of the church continue to prosper. Those who tithe for a period would not think of going back to the haphazard way of giving to the Lord that which is convenient.

We would recommend that our Stewardship Committee, our ministers, and all others in the North Carolina and Virginia Conference give more time and thought and emphasis to Stewardship. Enough faithful stewards in our church will relieve the problems of all the various enterprises we support.

The report of the Committee on Stewardship was adopted. The report of the Historian was presented as follows:

REPORT OF HISTORIAN.

At the 1950 session of this Conference, Shallow Ford, N. C. it was reported that there was in the treasury \$539.49 for the improvement of the James O'Kelly cemetery. On October 15, 1951, the treasurer had in hand \$965.04. As was announced in *The Christian Sun* recently the next session of The Southern Convention will be held in Durham, N. C. This will afford those attending the Convention opportunity to visit the cemetery as it is only ten miles away, and it is hoped that by that time the improvements will be in progress.

Not much progress has been made in 1951 in completing the history of the local churches of this Conference. Dr. N. G. Newman is doing an excellent work in writ-

ing the history of the churches of the Eastern Virginia Conference. Last spring I began the work of typing from The Annual the reports of the historians of both The Southern Convention and the local Conferences with the purpose of having these bound into one volume, together with other important historical matter, and put in the church history room at Elon.

There seems to be an increased interest in the work and growth of our various church organizations. The Pilgrim Fellowship is a great agency in influencing our young people to become active in religious work and in preparing them for future leadership in the church.

The Laymen's Fellowship has held during 1951 several district meetings with an average attendance of about one hundred. A general meeting of representatives from all the Conferences was held at Elon last year with five hundred present.

In the report to the 1950 Conference a resume was given of the progress of those churches of the Conference organized by the Home Mission committee since the beginning of the present century. By reference to THE ANNUAL of 1950 we find that six of these churches have a property value of nearly half a million dollars. In this same year these same churches raised for all purposes \$122,172. One church raised for Foreign Missions alone \$4,258. Another, for missions and benevolences, \$11,171.

Fifty-two years ago the North Carolina and Virginia Conference had 2,778 members and thirty churches. The property value was \$25,615. \$2,066.50(?) was paid to the fifteen ministers laboring in the Conference. This gave each pastor an average salary of \$133.33. It is remarkable that since that time the Conference has lost only six of these thirty churches.

To give in this report an accurate account of the material and spiritual progress of our forty-six churchs is impossible to do until all reports are in. The one of our number in a position best to give an opinion says that there is a disposition on the part of our ministers to place greater emphasis on both evangelism and stewardship.

Beverly Hills in Burlington has been organized with fifteen charter members, and has prospect for growth.

Calvary Christian Church of Greensboro, Rev. Thurman Bowers, pastor, has come into our fellowship with one hundred and seventy-five members. They have a property value of approximately \$30,000. There are two hundred members in the Sunday school and strong young people's and women's organizations.

There are prospects for a new church organization both at Brookwood in Burlington and Lake View on the road from Burlington to Union, N. C.

The following additions have been or are now being made to church property: Apple's Chapel is erecting an educational building. Bethel and Mt. Zion are making major improvements. Bethlehem has completed and opened their beautiful new building, costing \$125,000. This church plant is the most modern and complete of any rural church building of our Conference. The first church of Burlington is erecting a handsome educational building. Beverly Hills has completed its new parish house. Concord has completed their brick building. Durham has within the present year paid nearly all the indebtedness on their new modern educational building. First Church of Greensboro is making good progress on their new building in a new and growing part of the city. Palm Street is now worshipping in their new church which has additions for Christian Educational work. The cost of the entire plant is over \$60,000. Zion, near Burlington, has completed the first unit of its building program.

The following parsonages have been built since last Conference: Beverly Hills,

Union, Va., Tryon, N. C.

The following new pastors have begun their work among us: Rev. Clyde O. Koon, Belew Creek and Salem Chapel; Rev. Lester Stanley, Gibsonville, N. C.; Rev. E. J. Clawson, Long's Chapel; Rev. Frank E. Ratzell, Asheville; Rev. Orville H. White, Tryon.

We have now in this Conference fourteen churches with a pastor giving fulltime service. There are ten fields with two churches each, one with four churches, and three fields with three churches each. In 1950 our property values were \$1,702,050. Add to this the improvements made and our property values in 1952 will be around \$2,382,000. The present membership of our forty-six churches is 10,193. The number of parsonages is twenty-two.

The report of the Historian was received to record

The report of the Committee on Superannuation was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUPERANNUATION.

The relief work among our retired ministers, ministers' widows and dependents is supported by the Board of Superannuation through our National Division of Ministerial Relief of the Board of Home Missions, New York. Money contributed for Superannuation through the apportionment is paid by the churches direct to the Convention Office. The Convention remits all funds received to our New York office, and regular checks are mailed to our pensioners. We regret to say that our contributions to the Division of Ministerial Relief are considerably below the amounts which they in turn pay to our pensioners. We urge our churches to pay in full the apportionment for Superannuation, and exceed it, if possible.

In addition to the Apportionment for Superannuation, our churches are urged at Christmas time to receive a special offering for the retired ministers. This is known as "The Christmas Fund for the Veterans of the Cross." This special offering constitutes a fund from which extra Christmas checks are sent to our pensioners, and in case of hardship or hospital bills occasional emergency checks are sent. In 1950 our Christmas Fund offerings amounted to around \$800, while in turn these special checks sent to our pensioners amounted to nearly \$1,500. Again we are receiving more than we are contributing. We urge our people to support the Christmas Fund which is in addition to the regular Superannuation apportionment.

D. R. FONVILLE, Chairman.

The report of the Committee on Superannuation was received to record. It was moved and carried that the Conference complete its business before lunch, moving the lunch hour to 1:00 p.m.

The report of the Committee on Budget and Apportionments was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BUDGET AND APPORTIONMENTS.

We commend the churches of the Conference for their earnest efforts toward paying the full apportionment goal for the year just closing.

We commend the churches which now follow the practice of sending payment on apportionments monthly or quarterly. We urge all of our churches to follow this practice, rather than waiting until the end of the year.

The Southern Convention, at its 1950 session, by resolution, requested that in addition to the regular apportionments for Elon College the Conferences and churches engage in an effort to raise a minimum of \$1.00 per member annually for Elon College. Money given to this cause is to be known as the Sustaining Fund. We earnestly urge that our people do their best in their effort to reach this goal.

When The Southern Convention gives to this Conference the total amount for each item of our conference apportionments, we suggest: (1) that the Budget and Apportionment Committee submit to the churches and pastors of the Conference the total amount of each item in the Conference apportionments; (2) that each church be requested to report to the Budget and Apportionment Committee of the Conference the amount it considers as its proportionate share for each item; (3) that it be understood this information is for the guidance of the Budget and Apportionment Committee for the Conference of 1952.

We recommend the following schedule of apportionments for the churches of our Conference, *including* the instruction from the Conference to combine the pastor's insurance "13 cents per member" in the apportionment schedule with the item, "Conference fund," and with the request that the churches pay at least half of their Conference fund by January 1, 1952.

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The report of the Committee on Budget and Apportionments was adopted.

The report of the Committee on Evangelism was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM.

"Go ye and teach." These words were used by Jesus. They are not only words, as such, but are a plan to win people to his kingdom and spirit.

We are of the conviction, that if this plan were carried out by the constituency of every church in our Conference, we could by next year realize a great success in our evangelistic efforts.

In the past, we as a Conference, have adopted some excellent reports, made by your Committee on Evangelism. Church relations, moral reform, social reforms, mass evangelism, personal evangelism, child evangelism, visitation evangelism, graded evangelism, and the program set up by the Evangelistic Advance have all been recommended to, and adopted by this Conference. However, we have not seen in our churches very much success. What is the trouble? We have not gone out and taught in the like spirit of Jesus or with the enthusiasm of our Apostolic Fathers. Therefore, we recommend to the Conference the following:

1. That our ministers tarry in prayer until ready to "Go and Teach."

2. That our churches tarry in unity and love that they may be empowered to

carry out this plan.

3. That our Sunday schools, missionary societies, youth groups, laymen fellowship, and any other organizations of our churches add to their efforts, a prayerful and fervent program of evangelism.

4. That our ministers and churches urge their leaders to attend the Leadership Training Schools, which have been planned, and that the continuing committee for the schools include when possible a course in evangelism.

5. That our churches, after being filled with the spirit of Christ, dedicate them-

selves to this plan to build the kingdom of God in the hearts of men.

6. That our churches have an annual roll call of church membership, so as to keep a correct record.

Pending the adoption of the report, the chairman and other members of Conference discussed evangelism within the churches of the Conference, pointing out the great loss in church membership of some of our churches this year because of revision of church rolls.

The report of the Committee on Evangelism was adopted.

Dr. A. D. Stauffacher addressed the Conference on "Changing Frontiers in the Promotion of Our Christian World Mission."

The report of the Committee on Social Action was presented as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL ACTION.

The Council for Social Action of the Congregational Christian Churches, in its draft statement for study and criticism by Congregational Christian Churches, has declared: "There are times in the affairs of men when faith seems futile, goals are elusive, and cynicism and despair are widespread. We live in such a time. The age-old dreams of peace and fellowship on earth appear to be fantasies and are easily discounted. Conflicts at every level—local, national, and international—breed pain and misery, discrimination and injustice, bitterness and enmity, and these results in turn produce further strife. Angry voices divide mankind and special interests override the common good." ("Christian Action for a World in Crisis," p. 1.) Conditions such as these challenge the Christian faith. Therefore, in the present

crisis no Christian can escape responsibility for social action. The refusal or failure to act does not and cannot exempt a Christian from his responsibility.

In order to understand more clearly the bases and goals of Christian Social Action, we recommend that each church in this Conference institute a program of education concerning social action. In this connection we urge that in each church groups be organized with the purpose of conducting discussions on the draft statement prepared by the Council for Social Action. This statement, entitled "Christian Action for a World in Crisis," may be obtained from the Council for Social Action, 289 Fourth Avenue, New York 10, New York.

In our dealing with others of different races, creeds, clases, and colors, we recommend that we remember our Lord's attitude toward discrimination and intolerance. We strongly urge all Christians that they seek to overcome all deliberate acts of personal and public discrimination on grounds of class, race, color, or culture.

Because of our firm belief in the separation of church and state, we heartily express our disapproval of the recent appointment of an ambassador to the Vatican. As an expression of this disapproval we recommend that each member of this Conference write his representative and senator in Congress and urge them to vote against the above appointment.

We recommend that this Conference and its members take a stand on the issue of Universal Military Training. Throughout the history of our country our citizens have opposed compulsory universal military training. They have opposed it because of its violation of our American democratic heritage and its unnecessary indoctrination of youth with militaristic thinking. At the present time a bill for the enactment of Universal Military Training is pending in Congress. The proponents of this bill, taking advantage of the anxiety in these tense days, are seeking, under the guise of emergency legislation, to have this bill for permanent compulsory military training passed. If the opposition to Universal Military Training is to be effective Congress must know where the people stand. Therefore, we recommend that the members of our Conference notify their congressmen that they are opposed to this legislation.

Conference. Mr. Rippy, a member of the Mt. Bethel Church, died, October 8, 1951, and is survived by his wife who lives near Reidsville, N. C.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

We, your Committee on Finance, have examined the records of the treasurer of the North Carolina and Virginia Conference and find them to be correct and in order. We recommend:

1. That the secretary be paid \$75.00 for cost involved in the transaction of his duties during the past year.

- 2. That the bills for Annuals, report blanks and programs be paid on the receipt of same by treasurer.
- 3. That \$300 be paid to the North Carolina Council of Churches and \$75 to the Virginia Council of Churches.
- 4. That the Executive Committee of the Conference be given the power to act on any request from the Conference Missionary Association during the year 1951-1952.
- 5. That the Conference treasurer be authorized to pay \$25.00 to Dr. Albert D. Stauffacher, and \$15 to Rev. W Millard Stevens, and other expenses incurred during this session of Conference.
- 6. That \$50 be given to the North Carolina and Virginia Pilgrim Fellowship for 1951-1952.
- 7. That the Conference treasurer be authorized to pay the pastor's insurance of the North Carolina and Virginia Conference.

The report of the Committee on Resolutions was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

We, your Committee on Resolutions, submit the following items for consideration:

- 1. That this Conference extend to the pastor and people of this church its gratitude for its hospitality as shown in the many provisions made for the needs and comfort of the delegates and visitors.
- 2. That we duly thank our officers and leaders for the careful preparation and hours of labor which have gone into the program of these sessions and the ongoing demands through the past year.
- 3. That we thank the speakers who have come to us from a distance to bring information and inspiration, especially Rev. W. Millard Stevens from Norfolk, and Dr. Albert D. Stauffacher of New York City.
- 4. That we express our regret at the absence of Dr. C. E. Newman whose heart and life are so closely bound to our work and who has given himself so unreservedly to the program of the Conference over so many years.
- 5. That this Conference seriously consider the advisability of holding a one-day inspirational meeting in the spring with the possibility that the latter be broken down into districts or associations to reach more people, and on ocassion to combine with the Eastern and Western Conferences for the values that might be gained from a state-wide gathering.
- 6. That the Conference authorize its Executive Committee to work in co-operation with the Eastern and Western North Carolina Conferences in maintaining our

standards by getting a court decision, if necessary, to keep unauthorized persons from assuming to be pastors of our churches.

7. That the Conference instruct the secretary to forward the following resolution to the Secretary of State and to our representatives in the U. S. Senate:

Be it resolved that the North Carolina and Virginia Conference of Congregational Christian Churches in its 126th session assembled at Reidsville, North Carolina, November 13, and 14, 1951, vigorously oppose the recent appointment of General Mark Clark as ambassador to Vatican City as an act contrary to our American tradition embodied in law in the Constitution which upholds the separation of church and state. We believe that such preferential action toward an institution of organized religion is an affront to the great majority of our citizens and that it can only result in confusion, strife, and bitterness within our nation at a time when such conditions will rejoice the enemies of freedom and weaken our leadership among the nations.

8. That the Conference adopt the following resolution:

Whereas, the proposed program for Universal Military Training for all young men is a violation of our American democratic heritage, and

Whereas, the adoption of this program would unnecessarily indoctrinate our

youth with militarism, and

Whereas, the manpower needs of our conutry are adequately met by the Selec-

tive Service system, and

Whereas, the future welfare of our nation and the strength of the Christian Church is dependent upon young people with deep spiritual roots which have been nurtured in the environment of a Christian home, school, and church for which military training is no substitute;

Therefore, be it resolved that the North Carolina and Virginia Conference of Congregational Christian churches go on record as opposing Universal Military Training, and that the secretary make known their opposition to Universal Military

Training by writing to the appropriate Congressmen.

By motion, the secretary was authorized to complete the minutes of this session and that, following the presentation of the gavel to the new president and to the new vice-president, and following the closing prayer, the Conference adjourn to meet Tuesday after the second Sunday in November, 1952, with the Bethlehem Church

Minutes of the Twentieth Biennial Session of the Woman's Missionary Convention

CHRISTIAN TEMPLE, NORFOLK, VIRGINIA MAY 1-2, 1951

Convention Theme: A Highway for Our God.

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TUESDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Twentieth Biennial Session of the Woman's Missionary Convention of the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches was called to order by the president, Mrs. O. H. Paris, at 2 o'clock.

Mrs. J. Monroe Harris gave an inspiring devotional using as her topic, "Quiet Lanes and Hill-Top Views."

Rev. W. Millard Stevens, pastor of The Christian Temple, welcomed the convention and recognized the ministers who were present. The secretary read a telegram from Mrs. Garland Spratley, expressing her regret not to be present for the convention.

REPORT OF THE VALLEY OF VIRGINIA WOMAN'S MISSIONARY CONFERENCE.

I became the president last July but will try to cover in this report the activities of the biennium under Miss Verdie Showalter's administration also. Miss Showalter attended the last one on March 13. We were represented at the School of Missions at Elon College last year by seven women.

Last spring the districts of the Valley Conference combined for one meeting at Bethlehem Church in the form of a Family Life Institute with Dr. Paul Reynolds as speaker. This spring the Rallies were held at Mayland and Leaksville with Mrs. E. E. McClintock of New York City and Rev. Richard L. Jackson as speakers. In the fall a Conference-wide meeting was held at Leaksville when Miss Margaret Blemker reviwewed the Near East book. Mrs. O. H. Paris, Southern Convention President, attended this meeting and the meeting of the Woman's Board the following day.

The Valley Woman's Conference was held in Winchester on July 4 with Miss Helen Frances Smith as the speaker and the session this year will be held at Leaksville on July 26. Miss Pattie Lee Coghill attended the conference, rallies, and board meetings. Two new socities were organized during the biennium and we have a promise of two additional ones this year. We raised a total of \$1,277.65.

REPORT OF THE EASTERN VIRGINIA WOMAN'S MISSIONARY CONFERENCE.

During the past biennium the women of our churches in the Eastern Virginia Woman's Missionary Conference have dedicated themselves to doing the will of their Heavenly Father through worship, consecrated service, missionary education, fellowship and stewardship of time, talent and money. The officers and members of each local society deserve praise for the commendable progress made in all departments of our women's work.

The thirty-seventh annual session of the Eastern Virginia Woman's Missionary Conference was held at the Christian Temple on October 6, 1949. Theme of that Conference was "We Dedicate Ourselves." There were 327 women who came to hear Timothy Chang tell about Han Mei School, in Shaowu, China, and Baxter Twiddy tell of his experiences in a Youth Work Camp in Europe. The thirty-eighth annual session was held at the Suffolk Christian Church on October 3, 1950, with more than 415 present. The theme for the day was "Thy Will to Do." The Conference considered it a rare privilege to have two interesting and inspirational speakers appear on the program. The keynote address was given by Dr. Ruth I. Seabury, Missionary Education Secretary of The Missions Council. She told the thrilling story of Christ and the Church in Japan. Mrs. O. H. Paris, our Convention president, brought us a wonderful message on "Thy Will To Do—With A Christ-like Spirit."

The Conference is divided into three districts each having a District Superintendent, who strives to present the plans, programs and needs of the missionary enterprise before the women of the churches in her district. In 1950 the spring rallies were combined, so that only one rally was held; this being in the form of a Family Life Institute conducted by Dr. Paul Reynolds, National Family Life Secretary. All churches having a women's organization were represented. The registration cards used indicated that 356 people attended. The 1951 rallies were attended by over 425 people. Mrs. E. E. McClintock and Rev. Richard-L. Jackson were our guest speakers. They helped to enlarge our vision for greater service and more effective witnessing for

our God.

The School of Missions at Elon College is being better attended by our women than ever before in past history. We had 59 to attend full time last year. The School of Missions and the District Leaders Meeting have provided our women leaders with the necessary blueprints and tools for the task they are striving to accomplish in the local society.

The reports for the past year show that 38 women's socities, 31 young people's socities, 26 children's socities, and 26 Cradle Roll socities are sending money through the Woman's Conference Treasurer. The amount sent in for the past biennium will

be found in the Woman's Missionary Convention Treasurer's report.

As we walk along God's Highway during the coming year may we use every opportunity to witness for him. Christ gave the great commission, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the en dof the world." (Matt 28:19-20.) May we not delay the work of God by our failure to obey his commission.

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA WOMAN'S MISSIONARY CONFERENCE.

The work of the North Carolina Woman's Missionary Conference was under the splendid leadership of Mrs. F. C. Lester up to October, 1950. Although I have been in this office about six months or more, I shall try as best I can to report work done during the past biennium.

The District Rallies in the spring of 1950 were combined into one Family Life Institute, with Dr. Paul Reynolds of Chicago as guest speaker. This was a very in-

spiring meeting and quite worthwhile.

At the fall Conference of 1950 our guest speaker was Miss Ruth Seabury, who gave a forceful and inspiring address.

For the spring Rallies of 1951, we had two outstanding speakers: Mrs. E. E. McClintock of New York, and Rev. R. L. Jackson, returned missionary from China.

Both were unusually good.

An effort is being made to increase our missionary giving by raising society apportionments. Needs for missions at home and abroad are even greater and more opportunities are opening up. Although our yearly giving for the past two years has been less than \$9,000, I hope we can make it close to \$10,000 this year.

In the first six months of this year we have given a total of \$5,172.64, including

\$1,336.65 for the Thank Offering.

Mrs. Lester was our representative to the bienial session of the United Council of Church Women meeting in Milwaukee, Wis., in November 1948. I had the privilege of representing the North Carolina women at the biennial session in November 1950, in Cincinnatti, Ohio.

In trying to fill the shoes of my predecessor, I feel they are almost to big for me. However, the women of North Carolina are well organized and they don't have to ask for much help in carrying on their mission work. They have been well trained. I am enjoying my job and pray that we may work for the Master with our whole hearts.

There are quite a few churches without a woman's organization and many need to be started again. We have organized a Caravan for the purpose of giving help

where it is needed and assisting in organizing new societies.

Though our yearly theme will change from time to time, it seems to me that the one this year should always be our aim—"Thy will to do." We always seek to do the Master's will in our women's work.

The following Departmental Reports were presented and adopted as read:

REPORT OF FAMILY LIFE DEPARTMENT.

I regret I shall be unable to be with you in this Convention but I assure you my

prayers and thoughts are with you.

Although the Christian Family Life Department is one of the latest to be included in our program of activities, it is one of the most important in this era of our living. Statesmen, educators, and religious leaders have begun to realize there is something lacking in the home life of the American peole. At the Mid-century White House Conference on Children and Youth held in Washington, D. C., last December when over five thousand persons from every state and territory of the United States met to gather facts about children's needs, the impending war in Korea was their greatest problem of all. This great gathering realized that nothing they could say or do would be of any value to the Nation's young, unless it helped them develop the kind of personalities that can withstand tension and adversity.

Religion held a definite place in this Conference, one of the outstanding speakers pleaded for "faith in God as Authority, Shelter, and Venture." This Conference closed with various recommendations and a pledge to children, one item of which reads as follows: "We will provide you with all opportunities possible to develop your own faith in God." This first opportunity should be in the homes of all children. It has been said, "Homes are a practice school for Life," and, "A people's culture cannot be better than its Homes." The Good Book admonishes parents to

"Train up a child in the way it should go."

It is a matter of grave concern when we survey the statistical reports of juvenile delinquency brought on perhaps through the lack of Christian homes. One of our first objectives two years ago was a Family Altar in every home; the president of each society in The Southern Convention was contacted requesting her to urge the women in her group to establish one in her home. There was reported to me an encouraging number who found this project most worthwhile.

The Family Life Institutes which were held in each conference in March 1950 conducted by Dr. Paul Reynolds, Secretary of Family Life and Young Adult Work, Division of Christian Education, Chicago, Illinois, enhanced interest in the pro-

gram of this department. The attractive posters which were exhibited pointed the way to various activities for a Christian Home. These Institutes led to articles

being sent by the conference chairmen to The Christian Sun for publication.

A copy of "The Family Celebrates Christmas," one of the Pilgrim Series Family Books and other literature, was sent each Conference Family Life Chairman in the fall of 1949 for them to suggest their use to their various societies. A group meeting was held at the Elon School of Missions last June to better acquaint the leaders with the materials and literature offered for developing Christian Family Living.

At the Eastern Virginia District Meetings, posters relative to this department were displayed and material for the observance of National Family Week, May 6-13, was suggested. A few weeks ago I sent to the editor of the Woman's page suggestions of places where literature could be obtained for activities in the churches relation to the timely topic, "Parents—Children—God." This is the theme to be discussed throughout our nation during Family Week.

A Family Life Travel Library has been available to any group who has expressed a desire for it. It behooves every mother to study, pray and live a Christian life within her own home. It is by precept and example the Youth of the land are

led into the ways of Christian living.

I beseech each of you to so live that it may be said of you "Her children rise up and call her blessed."

REPORT OF CRADLE ROLL SUPERINTENDENT.

There is no statistical report since I do not have complete reports from the Conferences. However, interest seems to have increased and there are more societies doing Cradle Roll work. I have answerd many cards and letters in regards to the work.

The same plan of work of previous years has been followed; that is to divide the children into two age groups, working with parents and children with parties,

programs, and materials.

The greatest drawback in this department is the lack of materials, especially books and stories. There is never more than one book to use with the mission study. This year it is Esa, A Little Boy of Nazareth, by E. Mildred Nevill. However, those of you who are looking for materials and books will find many useful ones listed in the Pilgrim Press Catalogue.

Just before starting this report I read a leaflet which is given to our Cradle Roll children to be used at home. This little leaflet which is called Home Guidance in Religion has a beautiful picture on the front, a story to go with it for the children on the back, and the two inside pages are filled with helpful suggestions and ideas for the parents to help with the child's religious growth. This particular issue reminds us that the pre-school years are the most important to a child's Christian development, because the parents have more time with him and the greatest opportunities to influence his activities; later they will find it very idfficult to change ways of acting and wrong attitudes that have been acquired.

I trust and pray that each member of our Convention will be more interested in the youngest department of our work and that the next biennium will show a greater increase in the number of societies promoting Cradle Roll work. MRS. KENNETH REGISTER.

REPORT OF CHILDREN'S SUPERINTENDENT.

To report acurately on the missionary education of children in The Southern Convention is an impossible task. We have no one method of missionary education. In Eastern Virginia there are active Junior Missionary Societies doing excellent work; in North Carolina and the Valley there are a few churches which do a good job through the regular Sunday school. One church takes care of the missionary education of its children during the Children's Church. We are not reaching all the children of The Southern Convention, but in certain spots here and there, we are

helping children to become missionary minded. The treasurer's report will tell how much the children of the Convention gave to missions during the last biennium, but it will not tell how children's interest have been caught by mission study books, or how their imaginations have been stirred.

Next year the children will be using the following books:

Home—Junior: Hungry Hollow, by Anna Rose Wright. Primary: Davey in the Sandhills, by Anne M. Halladay.

Foreign-Junior: Off to Brazil, by Nina Millen.

Primary: The Children Downstairs, by Virginia Mazer and Hazel V. Orton.

A children's booklet will be included in the Woman's packet.

We further recommend the use of our Pilgrim Series literature with children in Sunday school. Since this is our own denominational literature, the writers can include material about our own missionaries and mission work, building it right into the curriclum courses. Certain courses are entirely missionary courses—the winter quarter of 1951, for instance. And many of the courses, while not primarily missionary, include illustrations of our missionary work. Each year at least one all church missionary project is suggested.

We also suggest use of the Family Books, many of which also contain missionary material.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S REPORT.

Young people in The Convention work for missions in several different ways; through Missionary societies, Youth Fellowship groups, organized Sunday school classes and other organizations. This year Eastern Virginia young people combined the Young People's Missionary Conference and Pilgrim Fellowship into one organization called the Youth Fellowship and then suggested a missionary goal to each local organization and to young people in churches without any organization.

The young people of The Convention have launched a special Missionary Project: bringing a student from the Philippine Islands for two years of study in America. They have high hope for the project, feeling that one of the greatest needs in the world today is trained Christian leadership in as many countries as possible.

There have been some fine missionary speakers at the young people's Rallies and Conferences during the past two years; among the most interesting were Miss Elena Maquiso from the Philippine Islands, who attended several of the young people's camps last summer, and Timothy Chang who always make a fine impression wherever he speaks to our young people. Richard Jackson will attend all of the young people's camps and conferences in The Convention this summer. Missionary films have been used on many occasions by young people in local churches and in their group meetings.

The Women's Convention has produced and financed a young people's packet each year which has been well used and appreciated. I have attended Board meetings and Committee meetings of young people's groups during the biennium. We do not know how we can help most but believe that it is important to have an adult ready to offer services in missionary thinking and planning whenever needed. We believe in the idealism of young people and their important place in the affairs of the world today.

The report of the Spiritual Life Committee was read by its chairman, Mrs. R. T. Bradford, and was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SPIRITUAL LIFE

During these days of world turmoil and confusion we are aware of the great need of an increased spiritual emphasis on those things which should be of great importance to us in our religious experiences. Our Convention Themes for the past biennium should have been a real inspiration to us as well as a challenge for deeper and enlarged spiritual growth: "We Dedicate Ourselves" and "Thy Will to Do." Unless we women by faith in God, through sacrifice and devotion, in repentance and in prayer constantly renew and strengthen our spiritual foundations, the time will not be distant when justice and law, which lie at the very heart of our civilization, will have vanished away. As a noted philosopher recently said: "Christians having a hold on the realities, will neither be easily deceived nor seduced by the illusions which threaten us."

We will find the Spiritual Life Department of our organization enriched and strengthened if we accept the six objectives as offered us in the plan and program of our Convention.

- 1. Cultivate personal religious growth.
- 2. Provide devotional services for group meetings.
- 3. Have a place for Bible study in our program.
- 4. Seek ways of reaching new and unchurched women.

5. Help each woman to find her place in the fellowship of our church.

6. Stimulate church attendance.

Realizing the miraculous power of prayer, we have each year urged you to establish among yourselves a "Fellowship of Prayer." At the beginning of the Lenten season this year a copy of a beautiful daily prayer for peace was sent to the president of each local society, requesting that a copy of this prayer be given to each woman, asking you to stop for a period each day at noontime to pray for peace.

"More things are wrought by prayer than this world dreams of."

For our recommended Bible Study 1949-50, we used the inspiring study of the Gospel of John. This study proved to be a great source of thought, giving a most comprehensive insight into the life of Christ and his ministry while on earth. Our Bible Study for this year 1950-51, "Great Bible Prayers" by Mrs. S. H. Askew, is an inspirational study of "Great Prayers, by great pray-ers from the greatest prayer book know to men!" We should experience a great growth in our lives as we have studied together these "Great Bible Prayers." "We may expect great things from God if we attempt great things through the study of his word."

For 1951-52 the recommended Bible Study will be the Presbyterian Bible Study of the Book of James. A guide for this Bible Study will be "Applied Christianity" by Samuel Glasgow. "These Things Abide" is a highly recommended guide book for the Leaders of the Circle Bible Study groups. Miss Lucy Steele, a great Bible student and teacher, will teach the Bible Study Course at the School of Missions in Elon in June. We are most fortunate to have secured Miss Steele for this great and

important work. She will be an inspiration to those who may hear her.

May I recommend to you again that you use the "Guide Posts" published by the Woman's Work Committee of the Missions Council of the Congregational Christian Churches. This periodical will be of great help in your devotional programs. You will also find Advance, the National Journal of Congregational Christian Churches, and our own Christian Sun great sources of information and inspiration.

As I hand this department over to a new chairman, I would like to commend to you the following prayer, trusting the beautiful message may help you as it has

"Help us, Lord, to be masters of ourselves, that we may become the servants of others. Take our lips and speak through them, our minds and think through them, and take our hearts and set them on fire. Amen."

The afternoon session was adjourned.

TUESDAY—EVENING SESSION.

The evening session was called to order by Mrs. O. H. Paris, president, and the hymn, "We've a Story to Tell to the Nations," was sung. The prayer was given by Rev. W. Millard Stevens, host pastor.

An address, "Tales of Road Makers," was delivered by Mr. Ken Stokes, president of the National Council of Pilgrim Fellowship.

Following a beautiful solo rendered by Miss Jennie Lee Bradford, Superintendent Wm. T. Scott introduced Mrs. Richard L. Jackson, lately returned from our Shaowu Mission, who inspired the convention with her address on "Friendship on the Highroads."

Rev. Prakash S. Bhonsle, of India, and Timothy Chang, of China, were presented to the convention. Following the offering, the convention was adjourned with the benediction.

WEDNESDAY—MORNING SESSION.

The session was opened with the hymn, "Jesus Calls Us," followed by prayer led by Mrs. F. C. Lester.

The following reports were read and adopted:

AUDIO AND VISUAL AIDS REPORT.

In making this report, your Audio and Visual Aids Chairman is placed in much the same position as the woman from Georgia who, during a church squabble, exclaimed, "We're just in the middle of a wonder what to do." Erasing all ideas of any squabble, the inference remains that your chairman is wondering how best to

proceed with this report.

The work of our Visual Aids department has enlarged in scope and interest until it is impossible to give statistical report. We are now a real part of The Southern Convention Audio and Visual Aid department, with the Rev. Henry E. Robinson, chairman. Joint conferences and councils have been held, and cooperative plans have been launched. We are doing far more at this time in our Visual Aids work than we can report. Increasingly, our films and slides are being ordered directly from our Missions Council Visual Aids Department or from various commercial Visual Aids Companies; all of which indicates an enlarged program and is all to the good, yet leaves your chairman right in the "middle of the wonder" of how to report.

The Convention Office materials, equipment and other channels of service have been used extensively. Miss Pattie Lee Coghill reports that "Second Chance" has had a least 65 showings in our Southern Convention which means that several thousand have seen this splendid picture. Incidentally, "Second Chance" was used by over half of all Congregational Christian Churches last fall. "Family Affair" which our department purchased this year, has also proved quite popular and helpful.

All in all we are convinced that there is a real awakening in our Woman's Con-

vention to the values of Visual Aids.

We have something new and fine to look forward to in September. "A Wonderful Life" will be available and free! This is the new 1951 Missions Council film, successor to "Second Chance" and promises to be even better. "A Wonderful Life" deals in fundamentals. It is the true story of a Christian family in Missouri; of how they faced life, and found meaning in it. It records the struggle of a man against poverty, the heart break of a girl seeing her beloved march off to war, the futility of a student faced with a world toppling over before her. But it is a happy film too, laughs, warm with love and affection. It will be available September 1st through our Convention Office.

You will be happy to learn too there is a fim strip provided to accompany our

new Pilgrim Series Sunday School materials each quarter.

Two concrete suggestions for furthering the usefulness and effectiveness of our Visual Aids Department have grown out of conferences with The Southern Convention Committee and with Miss Coghill. We submit for your consideration:

1. By "fixing" and adhering to a service charge for films and slides from The Convention Office. This should take care of postage and damages. Previously, a service charge of \$1.00 was set but not adhered to. At the request of our Executive Board of the Woman's Convention, your chairman conferred with The Southern Convention Chairman of Visual Aids and with Miss Coghill and we hereby suggest a service charge of 50c instead of \$1.00.

2. That our Woman's Convention collectively or individually, contribute toward the Visual Aids Fund which is being sponsored by the Laymen of The Southern Convention. The goal is \$375.00 and half of this amount has been given. The intention of The Convention Committee for this fund is to buy a sound projector, a record player, a splicer, a screen and an auxiliary amplifier. All of these would be

used by and for the benefit of the entire Southern Convention.

Your committee has endeavord to counsel with Timothy Chang on his training program and expenses.

Timothy has continued his studies at Duke Divinity School, and will graduate with the Bachelor of Divinity Degree on June, 4, 1951. He has made good grades and has been a favorite at Duke Divinity School, as well as among our churches. He has continued to visit many churches and church groups.

Since Rev. Richard L. Jackson returned from China, he has cooperated with our committee in helping to devise plans for Timothy's future. We have all been concerned with the turn of events in China which seem to make it impossible at this time for Timothy to return any time in the near future. His return now would imperial his life, in all probability. We have endeavored to work out with him plans whereby he may spend the next year profitably in study and service, awaiting the time when he can return to Shaowu.

At the present time, he is making plans to study at Hartford Theological Seminary, beginning in September, where he can get not only further training, but can have an opportunity for service. During the summer of 1951, he will work as a summer student in Bible school work among the churches of our Convention. Just as soon as the way is open for him to return to China, he will wish to do so, of course.

From the period June 1, 1949, through March 31, 1951, a period of 21 months, we submit the following financial report:

REPORT OF THE FRIENDLY SERVICE CHAIRMAN.

"It is because we work in small groups and at seemingly small tasks that we so often lose the vision. We plan a program, arrange a worship center, set up a study group, provide a fellowship meal, gather supplies for a hospital or our overseas neighbors, urge voters to the polls. But each lowly task expresses our concern that the spirit of Christ shall come to fruition—everywhere among all people."—The Manual.

What is Fiendly Service?

Friendly Service is not another new plan. It is the time-honored channel through which women's groups have been providing sheets and pillow cases, surgeon's gowns, hospital dressings and other material needs for our schools, hospitals and other mission centers at home and abload. The term includes various activities which change from time to time to meet current situations. It is an "over and above" service of our church women.

At the beginning, Friendly Service meant providing linens and supplies for mission school dormitories and hospitals through the work of our hands. In this day of ready made furnishing and clothing many supplies are purchased, but the two-fold

purpose remains:

1. To provide the supplies.

To "learn by doing" more about our missionary institutions at home and abroad.

It is difficult to give a complete report on what has been accomplised through our Friendly Service activities in The Southern Convention during the past biennium. For the year 1949-50 our Friendly Service gifts were designated for the migrants in the homeland; while our foreign project included gifts for Japan—to be sent to Miss Angie Crew at Kobe College and the Rev. and Mrs. Wm. Q. McKnight of Doshisha University. When the reports were tabulated at the close of 1949-50, it was found that a very large percentage of our women's groups had contributed to the Friendly Service projects.

The list for 1950-51 included Community projects, Franklinton Center and the migrants for the homeland; and the Near East for the foreign projects—children's books to be sent to Dorothy Blatter at Istanbul, Turkey, and used clothing to be sent to Lebanon to be distributed by the Rev. Horace M. McMullen at Beirut. Of course, the current year's reports are not yet due, but I am confident the response

has been just as fine as in previous years.

Now, for 1951-52 it has been suggested that we include Franklington Center, Ryder Memorial Hospital at Puerto Rico, Fort Berthold Indian Mission in North Dakota, and the Migrants on the present list for the homeland. For the foreign list, we will include Japan—the gifts to be sent to Miss Angie Crew and the McKnights; and also continue the gifts to Lebanon to be distributed by the Rev. Horace M. McMullen. Detailed information and addresses will be supplied by the Friendly Service Chairman.

It has been a real pleasure and a privilege to work in the Friendly Service Department during the past four years, and it is my prayer that the new chairman will

be given the same cooperation I have enjoyed.

REPORT OF THE CONVENTION EDITOR.

Mrs. W. J. Andes served as editor of the Woman's Page in *The Christian Sun* for the first eighteen months of this biennium. She did an excellent job of editing that page and has set a high standard for her successor to follow.

For the last six months it has been my pleasure to serve as your editor. This is work which I really enjoy and I appreciate the privilege of serving you in this way. There are four things which I try to do on our page:

1. Present items of denominational and interdenominational interest, such as the series of "Missionaries for Special Study," information about the work of the wom-

en's department of the National Council of Churches, and ways in which women can support the denominational program through their local churches.

- 2. Present programs for and reports of meetings of interest to women in The Southern Convention, such as Rallies, Women's Conferences, and the Woman's Convention.
- 3. Present the work of the various departments of our women's work in The Southern Convention, such as Friendly Service projects, plans for observance of Family Week, and Spiritual Life emphasis.
 - 4. Present ideas, programs, projects from our local women's societies.

For the first of these items I am directly responsible. The officers of The Convention, Conferences, and Rallies are responsible for sending in material for the second and third. Responsibility for the last item must rest with the women in the local churches.

During the six months I have edited your page, I have been particularly pleased with the response which has come from the local societies. Every week, except when special issues of *The Sun* precluded our having a page, we have had material filling one page—and many times it has greatly exceeded that amount. My hope is that the officers will feel their responsibility for providing me with material concerning meetings and plans, and send it to me far enough in advance so that it can be printed in time to be of maximum service to our women.

All of you who have material for our page can help us have a well-rounded presentation of our work by sending your material to me. This will enable me to plan the page for each week, knowing exactly how much material has been sent in, and the nature of it. One of the privileges—and responsibilities!—of being an editor is to "edit." This means that sometimes I must "cut" your articles to fit the space available, or to avoid duplication. This I am sure you will all understand.

Thank you for your cooperation in making the women's page one of the best in The Christian Sun.

Women of The Southern Convention believe in literature for their work, willingly invest money in it, and make good use of it in their local societies. They have been most helpful in honestly appraising materials in the packets and in making suggestions for improvement. The response of the societies to our questionnaire about the packet delighted your committee of appreciation of materials invaluable. While the expression of appreciation of materials was most heartening there was indication that sometimes programs are not usable in local groups, either because they do not meet the interests of women or are too difficult to put on. All of this leads us to realize that we must ever be on the job to discover, or even to write, additional programs.

We have followed along in the footsteps of our predecessors in preparing the packets and are grateful for those in times past who set the standard and pattern for them.

Packets were prepared for use during the past two years by the Literature Committee. The theme for 1949-50 was "We Dedicate Ourselves" and the mission study themes, "Japan" and "Cooperation for a Christian Nation," and the theme for 1950-51 was "Thy Will to Do" and the missionary themes "The Near East" and "Toward a Christian Community."

The packet for 1951-52 is well on its way to completion and will be ready for distribution at the Elon School of Missions in June. The theme for the year is the one used at this Convention, "A Highway for Our God" and the foreign mission theme is "Latin America" (with special material on our Congregational Christian work in Mexico and for the observance of our one hundredeth anniversary in the Micronesian Islands), and the home theme is "Churches for Our Country's Needs."

The packet will again contain the Bible Study Book, the mission study books (for those societies desiring them); and a Year Book designed especially for use in local societies. A year-book for children's workers will be added. An experiment with printing rather than mimeographing, the Year Book last year met with almost

unanimous approval and 700 copies were printed. The supply was exhausted early

in the year and we already have more requests for the coming year.

The Young People's packet is a tremendous undertaking. Originally the women planned to provide a packet of program suggestions for monthly meetings. There are now groups which expect program material for fifty two weekly meetings! This is an impossible task even by our National Young People's department, and they with us realize that the need for good program material for local young people's groups is our greatest need in young people's work. For this reason, a whole morning's session will be devoted to a discussion of local programs when The Southern Convention young people's officers and counselors meet at Cypress Chapel May 4, 5. While we are attempting the "almost impossible," efforts to produce a young people's packet seem to be appreciated and the young people depend upon it more than we usually realize for their meetings. A packet will be produced this year.

Your committee arranged for books on consignment from Pilgrim Press for sale at the School of Missions, the fall conferences, the rallies, and the same arrangement will be made this year. It is impossible to accurately record the amount of office work involved in the work of this committee because letters and materials are sent all through the year. Our one recommendation to the women of The Convention in the matter of literature would be that you purchase all of your materials for the year (not just the packets) at the School of Missions. This would allow us to spend more time in helping local groups to use the materials in a better way!

We are grateful to all who have cooperated with us, and we feel that this is

most of you. Together, we can do an increasingly effective job.

REPORT OF HISTORIAN.

(From 1928 to 1938, inclusive.)

While this report is concerned with the events of a later date, it seems fitting that a brief history be given of the host church. We are meeting today with a church that is compartively young, but the roots of the Christian Temple run far into our denominational history. It represents the merger of three churches-Providence, Memorial Christian Temple and the Third Christian Church. Providence was organized in 1804 and became one of the foremost churches of the Conference. It was served by some of the ablest ministers of the denomination, many representative families worshipped there during the more than one hundred years of its existence. The Memorial Christian Temple was organized under the labors of the outstanding Dr. C. J. Jones. It too, had an interesting history. It was predominantly a missionary church. Under the leadership of Dr. J. P. Barrett, the congregation was fired with missionary zeal. The day of the annual missionary offering became the red letter one of the year. The membership thrilled as the offering increased from year to year until it reached \$1,300.00. This was sent to the Mission Board for the support of the church's own missionary in Puerto Rico, and the cancelled check was framed and hung on the walls of the church. The women of Memorial Christian Temple were the first to reorganize their Missionary Society under the new setup of the Woman's Missionary Convention. (That first president is here today.) The Third Church was organized in 1907, and grew rapidly until the merger. This building was opened in March 1924, and just six weeks later the Woman's Missionary Convention met here in conjunction with The Southern Convention, as was the custom at that time.

Dr. L. E. Smith, the pastor, was happy to "show off" the Temple in its new beauty. Those of you here today who were present then will remember that the Ladies' Bible Class room afforded ample space for the delegates and visitors of this

meeting. (The events of this session have been previously recorded).

When The Convention met with the First Christian Church in Raleigh, North Carolina, April 29, 1930, no longer would one of the class rooms afford ample space. This session was marked by a large increase in attendance. The reports showed all. departments were making definite progress. The Superintendent of Life Memberships and Memorials reported that to this date 129 certificates had been issued. The Convention Editor was preparing programs for the societies of each Conference. The Spiritual Life Department had given increased interest in Bible Study. The Convention stood in recognition of the splendid work done by Mrs. R. T. Bradford, Superintendent of Young People. The Young People's Conferences were now well organized. With us, at this session, were two outstanding speakers—Mrs. C. P. Garmon, one of our missionaries to Japan, and Mrs. John Ferguson, president of the National Council of Protestant Church Women. Everyone present will long remember the message that each speaker brought. The total biennial offering was \$25,449.07.

The tenth session was held in the First Christian Church, Burlington, April 26, 1932 and was marked by still increased interest, especially in mission study classes. Outstanding speakers had been secured for the District Rallies and Conferences, A standard of Excellence was being used in all societies. Another forward step was the consideration of a part time secretary to help strengthen the work. Dr. J. O.

Atkinson, and Dr. Charles Burton addressed the meeting.

The eleventh session met with the Suffolk Christian Church, May 1, 1934, and was a gala affair with the largest attendance to that date. Thirty ministers and many visitors were present. Mrs. C. H. Rowland, our first president, and guiding light through the years, sounded a note of optimism in a resume of our work since its organization. Miss Eunice Thomas of Foochow, China, told of her experience with "Oriental Problems." The goal for the next biennium was \$27,000.00. Mrs. J. A. Williams resigned and Mrs. W. R. Sellars became the fifth president.

The next and twelfth session met again with the Burlington Church, April 28, 1936. This too, was largely attended. The number of ministers present was evidence of the loyal support they had given our work. All officers in presenting their reports felt that a high spiritual level had been reached. Dr. J. O. Atkinson gave a survey of work since 1913. Miss Olive Green, of Smyrna, Turkey, spoke on "World Wide Objectives." Plans for the great Silver Jubilee to be held in 1937 were lanunched. Mrs. C. H. Rowland conducted a very reverent memorial service for our third president, Mrs. W. H. Carroll, who passed away November 5, 1935. Mrs. W. R. Sellars resigned making Mrs. John G. Truitt our sixth president.

Our last session to be held with The Southern Convention met with the First Christian Church, Portsmouth, April 28, 1938. The highlight of this session was a report on the Silver Anniversary Service held in the Suffolk Christian Church, May 13, 1937. Dr. W. W. Staley was memorialized by this occasion, and very fittingly so as he was the founder of this organization, and followed each movement with his ever wise counsel. The Staley Memorial Fund was discussed and referred to the Woman's Board for further study. The revised Constitution was read, and the re-

quest of the committee for more time to prepare the same was granted.

The Convention was saddened by the announcement of Miss Victoria Edward's death. She was better known to us as "Our Victoria of the Hills" (Fancy Gap,

Va.). A letter of condolence was sent to her family.

The 1938 session found the Young People and Women interested in many phases of mission work. The women had helped different stations in China, Japan, and India, and many needy points here at home. The Young People showed great interest in their contributions to Santa Isabel, the Mountain Work, the Sendai Field. The Board was now composed of eleven members. There were 89 Women's Societies; 48 Young People's; 25 Junior's; 34 Cradle Rolls, total 196. Total receipts for the biennium \$18,289.84.

In the absence of Mrs. Robert A. Whitten, Mrs. F. C. Lester read the following report on Inter-Denominational Cooperation, which was adopted as read.

INTERDENOMINATIONAL COOPERATION.

"Ecumenical" is an old word that is taking a new meaning for the church as a whole and particularly for church women who are happily at work helping build the Kingdom in the many fields of service which are constantly opening to women.

"Of the whole household of faith" or "the whole household of God, all nations and all branches of the church" are phrases peculiarly appropriate to those who constitute that fellowship of believers who are working unitedly, a Christian army under one flag, with one purpose, that the name of Christ shall be exalted and that men and women be brought to a saving knowledge of Him whom to know a right is life eternal.

New avenues of service are continually opening to women who have found that, when the best of each denomination's program is contributed into one melting pot, the result is one great whole; interdenominational, with preference for no particular, race or creed, powerful and effectual. The forces of evil are united; so, indeed, must

be the forces of righteousness.

The three days for special emphasis, World Day of Prayer, May Fellowship Day and World Community Day are times when church women are uniting in ways that are proving helpful in local societies. Reports received, which are by no means complete, show that an increased number of societies are observing these days each biennium. The themes, "Peace is Possible," "Love Thy Neighbor," "Faith for Our Time," "Perfect Love Casteth Out Fear," "Our Daily Bread" and "Thank God for Work," selected materials prepared and gift projects suggested by the United Council of Church Women have been appropriate, inspiring and helpful. It is evident that many women of our own denomination have found a new joy as they worked with women of other churches in committees and as they worshipped together on

these special days.

The Ecumenical Register, launched in October 1949, was an attempt to give our Christian women of America a new sense of oneness as they contributed their \$1 and "stood up to be counted." The registration reported in Cincinnatti in November, 1950 was 367,428. The Assembly voted that the funds from the Register be used for endowment and emergency, for the necessary expenses of setting up the new General Department of United Church Women, and for ecumenical education and fellowship within the state, across the nation and around the world, the funds to be administered and reported periodically by a committee of which Mrs. Fred Luchs, Athens, Ohio, is chairman. The work done for the Register has accomplished much as it stimulated a new interest in Christians working together. It was decided to keep the Register open actively until May Fellowship Day, 1951. I do not have the exact figures on our Convention registration but am sure that we are far from 100 per cent enlisted among the First Million women. The million mark has not yet been realized but the feeling that we are more united in plan and purpose and program is evident.

It was during our last biennium, on Wednesday morning, November 28, 1950, in Cleveland, Ohio, that the National Council of Churches of Christ in the U. S. A. was born. Made up of twenty-nine constituent denominations and eight merging agencies, linking 32,000,000 Christians in 150,000 churches across the land, this was a great moment in religious history. This action also means a closer union and a

new united program of Protestant Church women.

There has not been a day in the history of our world when the earth's people seemed more bewildered, when the forces of darkness seemed more threatening. Likewise, there has not been a day when women were more recognized as a power. Is there any limit, then, to what Christian women can do, unitedly to exalt the Christ and present Him to a world in desperate need of a Savior? Who knows but that "thou art come to the kingdom for such a time as this?"

Remembering the prayer of our Master that "they all may be one" may the women of The Southern Convention accept the challenge. May we unite with women of other denominations as we accept our responsibilities and seize our opportunities in this day when we of the ecumenical church, of "the household of faith," have a job

to do-an assignment from God.

REPORT OF CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE VI.

Section 3 (c). Any vacancies in officers, departments and standing committees shall be filled by the Executive Board of the Convention or the president, to serve until the next session of the Convention,

Shall read:

Section 3 (c). Any vacancies in officers, departments and standing committees shall be filled by the Executive Board upon nomination of the Nominating Committee, to serve until the next session of the Convention.

Section 3 (d). A Nominating Committee composed of five shall be appointed by the president at least three months before the regular session of the Convention. The committee shall make nominations for all officers, departmental superintendents, and chairmen of standing committee. Nominations may also be made from the floor.

Shall read:

Section 3 (d). A Nominating Committee composed of five shall be elected by the Convention in biennial session, upon nomination of the Executive Board. Three members of the committee shall be elected one biennium and two members, the next biennium. The committee shall make nominations for all officers, departmental superintendents, and chairmen of standing committees; nominations may also be made from the floor.

ARTICLE VII.

Section 1. The Executive Board shall be composed of the Convention officers, departmental superintendents, chairmen of standing committees, and presidents of the constituent conferences.

Shall read:

Section 1. The Executive Board shall be composed of the Convention officers, departmental superintendents, chairmen of standing committees, and presidents of the constituent conferences. The immediate past president of the Woman's Convention shall be a member for one biennium.

By-laws.

Section 3. Convention Biennium—The fiscal year of The Convention shall by May 1 to April 30. Financial reports shall be of this date.

Shall read:

Section 3. Convention Biennium—The Convention biennium shall be from adjournment of one regular session to adjournment of the next. The fiscal year of The Convention shall be January 1 to December 31.

- 2. We recommend that the year the Woman's Convention is in session that the Convention decide on the Thank Offering project, and on alternate years the executive board have power to decide on a project. Those actions to be final.
- 3. We recommend that the Thank Offering for the year 1951-1952 go to the International Christian University in Japan.
- 4. We recommend that the local society treasurers send their quarterly reports to the conference treasurer not later than the 15th day of December, March, June and September.

The report follows:

REPORT OF WOMAN'S CONVENTION PRESIDENT.

It would be difficult for me to bring you a detailed or statistical report of what I, as president of the Woman's Convention, have been doing during the past biennium. I'm sure you are aware that a president's duties and opportunities are many and varied. Her interest and activities cannot center on any one phase of the work, but must be ever alert to promote the whole job-just as she must not only seek to advance the work on the local and state level, but must also be mindful of the responsibility and compelling task of the denomination as a whole. Though working for the most part under difficulty, I have tried during the biennium to promote the work of the denomination and particularly the work of the Woman's Convention. This I have done through Boards, Conferences, Committees and local societies.

Aside from our own Conference, Boards, and Committees, I have served on the Mission Board and Executive Board of The Southern Convention and on various Committees of those Boards. Have acted as Chairman of the Advisory Committee to administer funds for Timothy Chang.

It was a real pleasure to represent you at several National denominational and interdenominational meetings where my mind was enlighted and my sould uplifted as I listened to great speakers and made friends with rich personalities. I represented you officially at the General Assembly of Congregational Christian and Evangelical and Reformed Women in Cleveland, Ohio, in 1949. At the General Council in Cleveland, Ohio in June, 1950, I was asked to present the Foreign Mission study theme, "The Near East" to the pre-sessions of the Women's group, also at that meeting I took part in the Dedication Service of the Woman's gift. Twice during the biennium I attended the Mid-winter meetings of the Mission Council, sharing in the meetings of the Women State Presidents prior to the meeting of the Council. Each year I was asked to report to that group some phase of our work here in The Southern Convention. For the past two years I have served on the Executive Committee of the Women State Presidents.

One of the biggest and most worthwhile projects during my term of office was the trip to the United Nations. There were twenty-three women representing all the Conferences in the Convention. Brief reports of the visit will be given at this

meeting.

These are a few of the major activities that have claimed my time and attention as we have traveled the road together. I feel that we have made progress during these four years—that the highway is a bit straighter because of our labors to-

gether.

Today, I step aside from my place of leadership and fall in line with you and you who day by day seek to make straight the Highway for Our God. Four years is a long time in some ways, but these four years that I have served as your president have passed very quickly. They have been busy days and happy days, bringing to me some of the richest experiences of my life. Of course, there have been difficult problems to face—times when we almost faltered by the wayside, but always you have come to the rescue, often with personal notes of encouragement and I knew that you walked beside me, with your hand at my elbow so that I fell not when I stumbled. Together we have traveled on, each one placing her stone in the proper place to make a firm foundation for those who walk the road after us.

There are many whom I would like personally to thank for their consecration and loyal support, for their consciousness of the needs of the world and their eagerness to help meet those needs; the Woman's Executive Board, the District Chairmen, Dr. Scott and the Convention office personnel, Pattie Lee Coghill and her secretary, Ruth Dunn, pastors of local churches, women in city churches, women in small town churches and women in churches in wide country places—all have spent endless hours of time and talent to make our program effective—to build a Highawy

whereby men may travel toward God.

Today that road is unfinished, there are many stones yet to be laid, particularly on the roads that lead out from God's highway. Always the wide and smooth road will be crowded with travelers but few there are who seek the by-ways and hedges where the going is rough—the roads of love and service and sacrifices that carry away from self and bring God's power to meet men's need. These are the roads you and I must travel in the days ahead.

I'm sure you join with me in saying to our new leader that we pledge to her our support for the journey ahead realizing that only as we walk together will

Christ be known.

Minutes of the Twenty-Fourth Annual Session of the Virginia Valley Central Woman's Missionary Conference

Leaksville Church, Luray, Virginia, Thursday, July 26, 1951.

MORNING SESSION.

THEME: "A Highway for Our God."

The Virginia Valley Central Woman's Missionary Conference met in its twenty-fourth annual session, July 26, 1951, with the Leaksville Church. The meeting was called to order at 10:30 a.m. by the president, Mrs. J. E. Bryant. After the singing of a hymn, Mrs. E. J. Rohart held the morning devotionals on the theme: "Roads of Awakening."

The visitors and ministers were then recognized. The roll call of

churches and societies showed eleven societies represented.

The District Superintendents gave their reports, and they were adopted and recorded in the secretary's book. Each superintendent stressed the hope that more societies be organized. All societies were reported using

the packets and study books, and are showing progress.

Mrs. Noah Painter gave the report on Spiritual Life. This report urged that we read our Bibles more; that we rededicate and reconsecrate our lives to His cause; that the Bible is our foundation for spiritual living, and that our faith in Him is our fortress against trouble and sorrow in this torn world. It stated that if we attend worship regularly, have family altars and strive to be faithful, God will honor His word that many souls will be added to the Kingdom.

Mrs. Robert Whitten, superintendent of Friendly Service, made her report. She told who, what and where were needed our Friendly Service gifts. If we could accustom ourselves to Friendly Service as a service to a friend, as an opportunity, rather than an obligation, and a privilege rather than a responsibility, the Master's "inasmuch" would take on a new meaning. Shall we accept our goal this year, One Home and one Foreign Friendy Service project in each society?

Miss Pattie Lee Coghill presented literature and books to be used in

1951 and 1952.

The history of the Valley Conference was given by Mrs. B. F. Frank.

Mrs. E. J. Rohart, superintendent of Family Life, made her report. She stressed this as one of the most important in our program of activities. She emphasized the glory and power of home; the development of the home to its highest level of life one of our great needs; the fall of homes under the stress and strain of modern life has become a menace to the stability of our nation. She stated that the home founded upon the Rock, Christ Jesus, will stand. Reports of each church are recorded.

Mrs. Harold Rhodes gave the Life Membership and Memorial report,

followed by Mrs. Bryant's recognition of all life members with a purple ribbon.

The following committees were appointed:

MORNING SESSION.

The Eastern Virginia Woman's Conference of Congregational Christian Churches met in its thirty-ninth annual session on Thursday, October 4, 1951, in Bethehem Christian Church, Nansemond County, Virginia.

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by the president, Mrs. W. T. Harrell.

Hymn, "O Worship the King"; meditation, "As We Journey," Mrs. Harrell; prayer, Rev. R. E. Brittle.

The president made her annual report:

THE MESSAGE OF THE PRESIDENT.

With October first a new year comes into being for the women, young people and children of our conference. It is a good time to pause and consider what success we have had towards our goals and to refresh ourselves with the evidence of progress made by our various departments.

The reports in this booklet give reason for a certain amount of pride and encouragement that our labor has not been in vain. However the potential power of some one thousand Congregational Christian women in the Eastern Virginia Conference is so great, that we should really feel we have only made a good start.

In the desert of disunity within nations and among people, a highway for our God remains to be built. We, as Christian women must help to build this highway. It will take endless hours of time, and talent but the challenge is ours. We can help to build a firm foundation for those who follow us. Will you accept the challenge?

During the past two years I have enjoyed many busy days and happy days, bringing to me many rich and satisfying experiences. Today a new president will be choosen and I covet for her the same cooperation you have given me.

Heralds of Christ who bear the King's commands, Immortal tidings in your mortal hands, Pass on and carry swift the news ye bring; Make straight, make straight the highway of the King.

Thro' desert ways, dark fen and deep morass, Thro' jungles, sluggish seas, and mountain pass, Build ye the road, and falter not nor stay; Prepare across the earth the King's highway.

Lord, give us faith and strength the road to build; To see the promise of the day fulfilled, When war shall be no more and strife shall cease— Upon the highway of the Prince of Peace. Amen.

Using the theme, "Progress Made Along the Highway," the following reports were made by the district superintendents:

WAVERLY DISTRICT.

"Thy Will to Do," has been the challenge to women of the Waverly District throughout the past year. This district consists of twelve churches, with 10 well organized socities three of the groups being classified as young people's socities.

The packets are becoming more popular, 6 have purchased them for use the past year. There are 52 subscriptions to *The Christian Sun*; 4 to *The Church Woman*; 8 to Advance; and 7 to Guide Posts. Most of the groups have well planed devotional services.

Miss Margaret Blemker reviewed "Assignment: Near East" and showed slides of her work in Turkey at Wakefield on November 14. Several members of the Bethlehem, Disputanta, Church sang hymns in Slovakian, attractively dressed in native costumes. The Christian Family Life travel library was used in several churches. The Bible study has been conducted in 6 socities.

The young people have studied the mission study in 4 groups and 2 groups sent Friendly Service gifts. Thirteen went to Elon or to the summer camps. The young people of the Hopewell Church have requested an apportionment for next year.

The children are doing their bit in contributions and learning of boys and girls in other lands. Three have reported having parties and others reported sending sunshine baskets to the sick.

Nearly every society has participated in Friendly Service. Franklinton Center was the recipient of these contributions and gifts. Other recipients were the Migrants in Florida and Lebanon.

Five socities have Christian Family Life Chairmen and 5 observed Family Life Week in May. I hope next year an active Christian Family Chairman will be reported in every society in our district as this is such an important part of our work.

The World Day of Prayer was observed in 8 of our socities and more socities are observing World Community Day and May Fellowship Day each year.

Mrs. E. E. McClintock, of New York, our National Secretary of Women's Work, and Rev. Richard L. Jackson were the speakers at the district meeting in Dendron, March 27. Mr. Jackson was commissioned for work in China in this district so his visit had special significance. A "Visitation Plan" (each socitiey to exchange a program with another society during the year) set up at the district meeting is creating new interest.

Active socities are: Burton's Grove and Richmond; Honor Roll Socities: Den-

dron, Wakefield, and Waverly.

I want to express my gratitude to Mrs. G. C. Brittle, the new superintendent for the Waverly District, for her sympathetic understanding and the fine spirit of cooperation she has shown me this past year. She skillfully planned and executed the spring district meeting. With her capable leadership and the spirit of loyalty which the women of this district have always manifested, I feel the "Highway for Our God" will have a firm foundation.

SUFFOLK DISTRICT.

There is an inspiration in doing things together. In addition to getting them done, you have the satisfaction of knowing that you are not working alone.

Will to Do" has been characteristic throughout the Suffolk District.

Mankind progresses and advances through the medium and use of ideas. They plan an important role in every walk of life. Progress made this past year has been due to the useful and helpful ideas from all the women. To each of you, I am grateful. As Christian women we must never forget that every living person has a definite life work and must keep before us the idea that it is essential to shape definite ideas to formulate certain plans of life and travel the "Highway for Our God." We must grow in character and in richness if we are to make Our Highway the Christian Highway.

In the 19 churches, there are 20 socities organized, with a combined membership of 905. Nineteen socities have presented a well planned devotional service for each meeting and 20 have conducted the Bible study. All reported using the packet and 19 the study books. There are 338 subscriptions to *The Christian Sun*, 16 subscriptions to *Guide Posts*, 33 to *Advance*, and 14 to *The Church Woman*. Seventeen socities sent Friendly Service gifts to the fields recommended by the Convention. Fifteen groups contributed to community service projects. Only 5 groups own Visual Aids equipment. Sixteen socities reported having opportunity to view pictures some with their own equipment others as guests of another church. One church suggested films to be added for coming year.

films to be added for coming year.

Twenty socities observed World Day of Prayer, 17 World Community Day and 16 May Fellowship Day. Fourteen socities reported having a Family Life Chairman and 17 observed National Family Week. Fifteen socities gave a total of 22 Life

Memberships and 9 gave a total of 17 Memorial certificates.

There are 17 Young People's Socities reporting, all using the study books and giving Friendly Service gifts. Sixteen sent money to Woman's Conference Treasurer.

One Memorial has been given, and 68 attended camps and conferences.

We have 16 Children's Socities in our District; 15 used study books and 12 sent Friendly Service gifts. They have 12 subscription to *Children's Religion*. There are 16 Cradle Roll Socities reporting; 14 of these held a program, 13 a party and 7 sent

Friendly Service gifts.

We have 19 Woman's Socities that achieved the goals of an Active Society. Ot these Antioch, Cypress Chapel, Damascus, Isle of Wight, Mt. Carmel, Oak Grove are Honor Roll Socities; Berea (Nans.), Bethlehem, Eure, Franklin, Holland, Holy Neck, Johnson Grove, Liberty Spring, Oakland, Suffolk, Union (Sou.), Windsor are Superior Socities.

The Mission Study Institute in Franklin, with Miss Margaret Blemker as speaker, was one of the highlights of the year's work in the Suffolk District. One hundred forty-six women attended with 17 churches represented.

Our District Rally at Liberty Spring on March 28, was a day of inspiration with

Mrs. E. E. McClintock and Rev. Richard L. Jackson as speakers.

I hope you will continue to cooperate with the new superintendent, Mrs. Ray Gordon, with the same loyalty and lovely spirit as you have during my year as leader.

NORFOLK DISTRICT.

The Norfolk District has 11 active Missionary Socities with an enrollment of 574 members—an increase of 41. Each society reported well planned devotional services and use of the Bible study and mission study; all observed World Day of Prayer with other churches; six, World Community Day and May Fellowship Day.

Subscriptions to The Christian Sun reported, 183; Advance, 16; Church Women,

9; Guide Posts, 20. Seven socities have sent news items to The Christian Sun.

Four churches own Visual Aids equipment and four others have access to equipment. Eight socities gave Life Memberships and Memorials totaling 14. Eight have Family Life Chairmen. One without, yet the majority of families have regular devotions. Family Life Week was observed in 7 churches.

Ten sent a Thank Offering to the Conference Treasurer and four of our organizations in the Norfolk District sent \$105 extra to be applied on the decoration of Whit-

ley Auditorium. Friendly Service gifts were reported from 10 socities.

Ten active socities are reported for young people. Eight use our study books; one Christian Endeavor material. All contributed to missions; and 6 reported Friendly Service activities locally and abroad. Thirty-eight attended summer camps.

Eight Children's organizations are reported, with 14 subscribing to Children's Re-

ligion. Three have participated in Friendly Service.

We have 7 active Cradle Rolls using Sunday school materials, Pilgrim Series, and

story books. Five Cradle Roll programs and 7 parties have been given.

morial of the good work of this department of our mission work.

We will use our Life Memberships and Memorials fund for the next two years for the renovation of rooms at Franklinton Center, Franklinton, N. C. We believe that in helping the Negroes to rebuild this institution, we shall be contributing much to the growth of brotherhood. Dr. Wentzel says "Christian Churches must do more than proclaim the gospel that in the sight of God all men are brothers; they must demonstrate that gospel." Those who selected Franklinton Center as our project must have had this same thought in mind.

LITERATURE REPORT.

The general theme for Women's Work this year is "A Highway for Our God," and the foreign mission theme is "Latin America" and the home mission theme is "Churches for Our Country's Needs."

Women.

We are pleased with the wide use of the Women's Packet prepared by the Literature Committee of the Convention, as indicated in the District Superintendent's reports. There is real interest in literature and a willingness to provide money for it.

Young People.

The Southern Convention Women have sponsored a Young People's Packet for the past few years, which has been most acceptably received and used by our young people and their leaders. The packet for this year is ready and along with other materials, contains the following on missions: the home mission study book, "Now," (suggestions for its use are given in the back of the book); "Why Not Visit Mexico"; the National Missionary Action Packet; an announcement about the Philippine Project; and Friendly Service suggestions.

Children.

Children's workers using missionary education materials either in the Sunday school or in Junior socities should have an abundance of helpful suggestions this year with the "Year Book for Juniors" prepared by Mrs. W. C. Seeley, Superintendent, Eastern Virginia; and the bulletin containing many different types of world friendship suggestions, prepared by Miss Julia Woodson, Convention Chairman of Children's Work. You will find in both of these and in Mrs. Seeley's report the children's books for the year. I am sure a year of good missionary education is in store for the children of our Conference.

Because of our inability to get funds into China we recommend to the Woman's Conference that the \$2,200.00 balance of the 1950 Thank Offering given originally for the Han Mei School be transferred to the American Board to support the work of Miss Corrine Norquest, associate missionary of our South African Mission, this fund to be divided in equal yearly payments for four years. Signed: Mrs. Russell Powell, Mrs. John Truitt, Miss Pattie Lee Coghill, Mrs. O. H. Paris, Mrs. W. T. Harrell.
- 6. "A peoples' culture cannot be greater than its homes." Therefore, we urge that as Christian women, we seek to develop more Godly homes; encourage a more reverend observance of the Sabbath; inspire a greater loyalty to the church and a more earnest support of its institutions. Mrs. Garland Spratley gave the report on Friendly Service, which was adopted as read, as follows:

FRIENDLY SERVICE.

"They helped everyone his neighbor," Isaiah 51:6.

Friendly help, touching all sides of life, is the surest means of teaching Christian love to all people in our land and abroad. Friendly Service has a two-fold purpose: it is an expression of love for our fellowman; second, it is educational, we learn of the needs of those with whom we share. As we become better informed about the institutions for which we are working, we are more concerned about meeting the needs of our schools, hospitals, and missionaries.

"Thy work, O God, needs many hands To help Thee everywhere, And some there are who cannot serve Unless our gifts we share."

The reports have shown the women of our conference are sharing their gifts at home and abroad. A growing interest has been manifested toward Franklinton Center. Deeds of loving kindness have been shown to the invalids and sick in the communities, through gifts of food, fruit, flowers, and visits. The young people have been encouraged in wholesome recreation through the participation of the Christian Women in the community in the Youth Centers. Children have been made happy going to summer camps sponsored by the woman's socities, others have received gifts at the Orphanage. A near-by hospital, Patrick Henry, for the chronically ill, has come in for its share of Friendly Service.

Love knows no boundary line, the children in Turkey have been remembered with crayons, books, wash cloths, soap, etc. The needy in Lebanon and Korea have had their bodies clothed. Several families in Czechoslovakia have been fed and in India

they have not been forsaken.

The Friendly Service Chairman of the Southern Convention, Mrs. W. E. Wisseman, had on display our projects for 1951-52 at the Elon School of Missions last June. These projects are listed in your new year book on page 19: Franklinton Center, Fort Berthold Mission, The Migrants, Lebanon, and Ryder Memorial Hospital. You have the privilege of participating in each of these projects but if you feel you cannot accomplish but two in your group this year I am recommending you undertake the Migrants in Virginia and Ryder Memorial Hospital.

Let us remember to dedicate our gifts before we send them from our churches. You will find dedication services in *Guide Posts* for October, 1948 and May-June, 1951. The gifts are carrying a special message from our shores to those who do not know us. They should be sent on their way with a prayer and thanksgiving for the

opportunity we have in meeting the needs of others.

The reports of the various departmental superintendents were as follows:

REPORT OF SPIRITUAL LIFE SUPERINTENDENT.

"A Highway for Our God"—what a lovely and inspiring theme we have for the new year. One which challenges us to the very depths. What a difference it would have made in all of our lives if we had always looked upon the "road of life" as the "Highway for Our God."

There are many ways of accomplishing the work of our fellowship through the departments or committees set up for the special needs. Underneath all these activities is the spirit which is the moving power. There is one committee of the fel-

lowship which is set apart to help women in their meditations, in their prayers together and apart, to a fresh and deepened experience. The spiritual life department presents opportunity for enrichment of spiritual life in such real and workable terms that each individual may see new ways of meeting the situations and problems of everyday living with an increased sense of the presence of God and what it means to follow Jestis' way of life.

Our prayer for each fellowship group is that they will avail themselves of the abundant supply of rich devotional materials, the source of which has been made available to all. Also have good worship services at each fellowship meeting and at special seasons such as Lent and Christmas. And that you will emphasize or provide source materials for personal daily devotional use. Use your theme hymn, "A Highway" whenever possible and various other special services you will find in your Guide Posts,

to help strengthen and enrich your fellowship meetings and activities.

We as fellowship groups can encourage and make possible the lifting of reading taste to higher levels through the devotional materials available to us. This can be accomplished in many ways; through book review teas, clipping files, bulletin boards, radio program guides, and lending libraries, always with emphasis on cooperation

through fellowship and on group participation.

For 1951-52 we hope you will find Bible study a great help in your devotional program. It is "Applied Christianity" a study in the Epistle of James by Dr. Samuel M. Glasgow. May I quote from the foreword of this story? "It is our prayer that as women of the church we will be led by this study to look into our hearts with courage and honesty and we may test the depths of our faith by the testimony of our daily lives, that we may truly 'act on the Word, instead of merely listening to it.' (James 1:21. Moffatt.) Unless there is such results, we shall have just another study, good but not vital, not good enough for these crucial times and the opportunity with which God has trusted us."

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT ON CHRISTIAN FAMILY LIFE.

It is encouraging to learn at the end of the year that our aims set forth last fall have been attained by a great number of our socities. Our aims were fourfold:

- 1. Seeking to have more families worshipping together and praying together for definite things. Realizing that prayer is the channel through which we reach God we feel it imperative that parents teach their children how to seek Him and His guidance.
- 2. Encouraging parents to bring their children to Sunday school, instead of sending them. Family Life Chairman were asked to work with Sunday school superintendents and teachers to enroll parents in the Sabbath school. It seems now that we of the church have learned that we cannot educate children and expect adult education to ensue as a by-product, but rather the church must start this educational program with adults realizing that religious education of the children will follow as a by-product,
- 3. Striving to help parents build a better home and direct their children's thoughts toward home and God; many books and periodicals on family relationships and God have been recommended for the church and home libraries.
- 4. Believing that in our approach to Christian Education we must see the home, church and the community inseparably bound together, effort has been made to unite all three in the observance of National Family Week. This is rapidly becoming a great work in our church calendar. In our Conference this year more churches took part in this observance than ever before.

A few weeks prior to Family Week I prepared and sent to every Family Life Chairman a pamphlet offering suggestions on how the home and church might be strengthened during this one special week. The pamphlet carried a bibliography of books and periodicals on Family Life, recreation and worship; also a list of helpful visual aids and suggested programs and activities for observing National Family Week.

I had posters on display at the rallies encouraging family participation in Na-

tional Family Week.

During the year we have had a circulating library of books containing thoughts and ideas on building home life
If we will set ourselves to building better homes in

America we shall build better churches, better communities and eventually a better world. Therefore I recommend that our aims for the coming year be:

1. Soliciting the church families to have daily devotional periods in their homes where opportunity will be given for personal participation in prayer.

2. Family attendance in Sunday school and worship.

3. The placing of good literature and the reading of good literature in our homes.

4. The observance of National Family Week in every community.

Then, during the summer quarter a party for the mothers and children is held.

If you do not have a Cradle Roll Missionary Society, why not start one now? Why not secure the names and birthdays of all your church babies and on a special day designated as Cradle Roll Day, have a service honoring these babies? It would be great if all churches in the Eastern Virginia Woman's Missionary Conference could

report next year we have a Cradle Roll Missionary Society in our church.

The Convention Cradle Roll Superintendent is Mrs. Carl Wallace, Franklinton, N. C. and there will be a new Conference Superintendent elected today to fill the vacancy created by Mrs. Herbert G. Councill, Jr.'s departure, who has moved to the State of New York. Please write the name of the new superintendent in your report booklet. I feel sure these ladies will be willing to help you in any way possible. Remember that special literature can be secured for this work from our Pilgrim Press, 14 Beacon Street, Boston 8, Mass. If you don't have a catalogue, write for one.

REPORT OF CHILDREN'S SUPERINTENDENT.

Again we are beginning a new year in our mission work. For our children's work we have thought and planned what we hope will be helpful to you in various children's departments. Please let me urge you to select for your children's leader in your churches someone who is deeply interested in missions and who loves children. A great challenge greets us as well as great opportunities; these are important years in their lives. Fastly they are growing into maturity; now they are interested in all of life; they are eager to learn; the soil is fertile. May we plant the seed of Christian brotherhood, love and unselfishness.

If we expect adult socities of tomorrow, we must begin today with these children. Here, I'm afraid, we have and are falling down on the job. We hear much about "One World," and with this is mind we teach and lead them to work for a united

world, all people the children of One Father, God.

1. If possible this year, select one Home Study Book and one Foreign Study Book: suggested home book, "Hungry Hollow"; suggested foreign book, "Off to

Brazil." Guides for each are available.

2. Help the children become familiar with our missionaries; set aside a special meeting to study them; learn their names and where they are working. Help them realize that it is a big job and a great calling. We have too few religious workers going from our churches now. These are our future hope. Let us begin with them now.

3. I would suggest that you select January for sending your Friendly Service gifts. This year Micronesia has been selected for children. The address will be found in your little booklet. Children are usually very unselfish in their giving; help develop this in them. Let them make some gifts, help pack and wrap them so that they may feel they are a part of the gift they are sending.

4. Last, may the booklets prepared by your Convention Superintendent and your Conference Superintendent help guide you in your work this year, and may you have a successful year in your children's work.

REPORT OF YOUNG PEOPLE'S SUPERINTENDENT.

Found on that part of the "Highway for Our God," which passes through that part of His Kingdom known as the Eastern Virginia Conference, is a group which may be considered the spring or source from which our future supply of workers and replacements are coming and will come. This group is familiarly known to us as the young people who are gradually finding their places on this great "Highway" and who are essential parts of a great working machine or organization well fitted together.

This group of young people form our charge and challenge as a group of Christian women. We are the mother group who if we live true to that beautiful relationship will not think too much in terms of ourselves, but will lavish love and guiding interest on those who through this fine relationship are our children. The first and most important attitude and act on our part should be our interest definitely expressed in every helpful way possible for the spiritual development of our young people. In this as in too many cases we need to shamefully confess that we have fallen far short of what we should have done in expressing to them the measure of love, helpfulness and guidance we should have shown. I know it does not sound good. You hate for me to say it, and it hurts me to need to say it, but it is true. Is it a fact or not a fact that we have thought more in terms of apportionments paid in full than we have prayed for them and with them that they as individuals might realize the fullness of Christian experience? And before we put on too many looks of satisfaction and to the continuation of our policy toward the future, let us become penitent for forgiveness, and rededicate our lives to our holy calling. This is what I mean. Take the socities in the average local church. There should be the closest relationship created only by love and guiding helpfulness, but in far too many cases the women's society knows only what has been done or is being done by reports from the young people's leader or treasurer. How many of the local woman's presidents visit occasionally with the young people? How many of us, as members of the woman's society, visit with them; encouraging and complimenting them on their good work; and better understanding their problems; so we may be in a better position to help them? I am very familiar with the three groups of young people and children in one local church where the mothers, who are members of the woman's group, help in putting across all major projects. We should not leave the whole responsibility to the young people's leaders.

In nearly all of our churches in this conference we have wonderful young people's groups and excellent leaders. Our help and work with them is and should be our primary home mission work. And unless we take this responsibility seriously our for-

eign mission light will not shine as far, nor as brightly as it should,

Your young people's superintendent has one special recommendation and request. This will be made generally, but hoping the churches affected by it will take special notice and govern themselves accordingly. There are in our conference several churches whose young people's groups are organized as Christian Endeavor Socities. Everyone of these has done an outstanding piece of work, for which they are to be highly commended. The request is that the work of these groups be more closely related to the work and program of our missionary conference. The women of these churches are asked to help guide in this direction.

tional and international understanding and fellowship.

Project No. 2 is "Aid for the Homeless." There are more people without homes than there were a year ago. A blanket will bring warmth to someone who has been cold too long. Hope for a new future may be strengthened by your gift. Share a blanket! Last year 28 socities observed World Community Day. This year let each of us remember that "faith without works is dead." "Live Thy Faith."

It is not too soon to begin to plan for World Day of Prayer. This year our theme is "Christ Our Hope." Last year every society reporting, observed World Day of Prayer. Let's make it unanimous this year, if possible: a World Day of Prayer service; in cooperation with other denominations; with every woman in attendance and participating; and with prayer ascending all around the world. What wonders may be wrought!

"Spiritual Security for Today's Families," is the topic for May Fellowship Day, which will be observed on May 2, 1952.

We believe that all families have the same basic needs. We believe that many families have lost the sense of being in touch with God. They need to be reassured of God's goodness rediscovered anew in Christ.

Twenty-five socities observed May Fellowship Day last year. The thought we give to living our faith, and the source of strength we will find as our minds center on "Christ Our Hope" on World Day of Prayer, will help us find spiritual security. What is the great need of today's families? Let's all seek that security for our families on May Fellowship Day.

FIRST CONGREGATIONAL CHRISTIAN CHURCH, DURHAM, NORTH CAROLINA, APRIL 29 - MAY 1, 1952.

TUESDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

The fortieth biennial session of The Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, Incorporated, was called to order by the president, Rev. W. Millard Stevens, at 2:00 p.m., on April 29, 1952, at Durham, North Carolina.

After the singing of the hymn, "The Church's One Foundation," the Rev. R. L. Jackson conducted the devotional service.

Dr. Stanley C. Harrell, on behalf of the Durham Church, extended a cordial welcome to the Convention, to which fitting response was made by President Stevens.

On Roll Call, it was found that there were forty-seven ministers and a large number (uncounted) of lay delegates present. The president declared a quorum present.

The Rev. W. J. Andes, chairman of the Committee on Revisions, called attention to the proposed revisions and stated that action would be taken thereon the following day.

The following reports were presented and announcement made that action thereon would be taken the following day:

The Educational Secretary-Miss Pattie Lee Coghill.

The Treasurer-Miss Edna M. Fitch, Assistant Treasurer.

The Committee on Evangelism and Devotional Life—R. C. Helfenstein, Chairman.

The Commission on Stewardship-Jesse H. Dollar, Chairman.

The Finance Committee-Stanley C. Harrell, Chairman.

Dr. L. E. Smith, president of Elon College, made a brief but stimulating address on "Freedom in Education."

The report of the O'Kelly Memorial Foundation was presented by Dr. Stanley C. Harrell, and on motion it was adopted.

Motion was made and adopted that the Business Committee take under advisement the question of enlarging the scope of the O'Kelly Memorial Foundation to include the Church History Room at Elon College and Old Lebanon Church in Virginia.

Dr. Jesse H. Dollar, vice-president, was called to the chair and in turn presented Rev. W. Millard Stevens, who delivered the President's Address, using the theme: "The Living Church." Text, I Corinthians 12:27.

An offering of \$73.45 was received for Convention expenses.

Announcements were made by Dr. Stanley C. Harrell, and the Convention adjourned at 5:00 p.m., with prayer by Rev. Thomas D. Sutton.

Simultaneous supper meetings were held by the Laymen's Fellowship and the Women of the Convention.

TUESDAY—EVENING SESSION.

The Tuesday evening session was called to order at 7:30 by Vice-President Jesse H. Dollar. The organist and choir of the Durham Church ably assisted Dr. Dollar in the service of worship.

Dr. Vere V. Loper, Moderator of the General Council of Congregational Christian Churches, was presented to the Convention. He brought greetings from our national fellowship and preached the Convention sermon, taking as his theme: "Our Christian Hope."

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered by Drs. Dollar and Loper, assisted by the deacons of the local church.

An offering of \$119.67 was received for Home Missions.

Dr. Dollar pronounced the benediction.

WEDNESDAY-MORNING SESSION.

The Wednesday morning session was called to order by President Stevens at 9:15. Rev. Fred Register conducted the devotional service.

Rev. Thomas K. Thompson of New York, executive director of the Joint Department of Stewardship and Benevolences of the National Council of the Churches of Christ, was introduced to the Convention.

A motion was offered and seconded that the proposed "Revisions" be considered but that final disposition be referred to the Executive Board with power after due notice was given and opportunity granted for any delegate to be present at the time action was to be taken. A substitute motion was offered and seconded that the proposed "Revisions" be postponed for two years. The substitute motion was carried.

A telegram was read bearing greetings from a number of young people of the Convention who are students at the Hartford Seminary Foundation.

On motion, it was voted that the report of the Executive Board be adopted and made a part of the minutes as follows:

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD.

The following persons constituted the Executive Board during the 1950-1952 biennium:

- 3. Members nominated by the Convention and Conferences and elected by the 1950 session of the Convention: Virginia Valley—R. E. Newton, R. A. Whitten; Eastern Virginia—Mills E. Godwin, Jr., H. S.  - The Board constituted its Executive and Office Personnel Committees as follows: Executive: W. Millard Stevens, Chairman; Jesse H. Dollar, Vice-Chairman; Will B. O'Neill, Secretary; L. E. Smith, John G. Truitt, Mills E. Godwin, Jr., H. S. Hardcastle.

Office and Personnel Committee: $G \in \text{orge } D$. Colclough, Chairman; John G. Truitt, Stanley C. Harrell, W. Millard Stevens, Ex-Officio.

During the biennium the Board has held four meetings as follows:

The first meeting was held at the Christian Church and Elliott Hotel, Suffolk, Virginia, October 24, 1950. Present were 17 members, the Superintendent, the Educational Secretary, and one vistor, Dr. Ross W. Sanderson, of the Board of Home Missions, New York.

- Upon recommendation of the Finance Committee, the following schedule of expense allowance was established for those attending the Convention Board and Committee meetings:
 - (1) Transportation: Single—3 cents per mile car allowance; or bus or railroad coach fare. Carload—3 cents per mile for driver, plus 1 cent per mile for extra passengers,
 - not exceeding a total of 5 cents per mile.

 (2) Meals and Hotel: Meals en route and while attending meetings; hotel or
- other overnight accommodations while attending meetings.

 2. The Finance Committee presented the following recommendation of the Personnel Committee:
 - "In view of the additional work placed upon Miss Coghill by the Woman's Convention, it becomes necessary that she have full-time secretarial service, therefore, the Personnel Committee recommends a full-time secretary be provided for Miss Coghill and that this recommendation be referred to the Finance Committee of the Convention with the request that the committee should seek ways whereby the salary of such a secretary may be provided."

Upon vote, the Board referred to the Mission Board the matter providing funds for Miss Coghill's secretary.

- 3. In accordance with Convention action, the Board elected five additional members of the Finance Committee as follows: S. H. Basnight, J. Robert Walker, R. E. Newton, George D. Colclough, Jesse H. Dollar.
- 4. The Board appointed the following persons to serve on the Survey Committee with Dr. Ross W. Sanderson's proposed study of the Congregational Christian Churches of the Southeast: R. A. Whitten, R. T. Grissom, R. E. Brittle, F. C. Lester, S. C. Harrell.
- 5. In accordance with the vote of the Convention providing for a committee to study the matter of rotating terms for Trustees of Elon College and the Christian Orphanage, the Board authorized the appointment of a committee consisting of Jesse H. Dollar, Duane N. Vore, Mills E. Godwin, Jr., L. E. Smith, John G. Truitt.
- Upon authorization of the Board, the President appointed the following committee
 to administer the Ministerial Loan Fund of the Southern Convention: John G.
 Truitt, George D. Colclough, Kenneth D. Register, L. E. Smith, Wm. T. Scott.
- 8. The Board voted to borrow for the Board of Publications the sum of \$2,500.00 to provide funds with which to pay the deficit on printing and postage for *The Christian Sun*, and that the President and Secretary be authorized to sign a note for this purpose in behalf of the Convention.
- 8. The Board accepted the resignation of Mrs. F. C. Lester as a member of the Board of Christian Education, and elected Jack P. Shoffner as her successor.
- 9. The Board authorized the payment of expenses of the President or his alternate to the session of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the United States, held at Cleveland, Ohio, December 1, 1950, and suggested to the Laymen's Fellowship and the Woman's Convention that they each send a representative to the Council meeting.
- 10. The Board authorized participation in the Social Security program of the Federal Government for the Convention office personnel
- The Board authorized the appointment of a committee on Gerontology as follows:
 R. L. House, W. B. O'neill, A. H. McIver, Stanley C. Harrell, Miss Pattie Lee Coghill.
- 12. With regard to aid to retired ministers, the Board voted "that the Convention cooperate with the Division of Ministerial Relief in their policies of aid to ministers, etc., and that our own Board of Superannuation be so instructed."

The second meeting of the Board was held at the First Congregational Christian Church, Henderson, North Carolina, April 17, 1951, with 21 members, the Superintendent and the Educational Secretary present.

- 1. The Board approved and adopted the action of the Executive Committee at a meeting held on January 22, 1951:
 - The employment of Miss Edna Fitch as bookkeeper and Assistant Treasurer, and to accept the resignation of of Mrs. Jo W. Williams.
- The Board considered with representatives of the Home Life Insurance Company of New York the matter of group life insurance and hospitalization benefits for pastors, pastor's dependents and full-time lay workers of the Convention and their dependents.

It was voted that on behalf of the Convention, Conferences and churches, we enter this type of insurance subject to the securing the necessary 75 per cent of pastors of approved churches; that the Superintendent be authorized and instructed to further the plan and that the Treasurer of the Convention be instructed and authorized to submit to the Home Life Insurance Company a binder check of \$100.00.

- 3. The Board noted that there was an item in the Accounts Receivable shown in the Treasurer's report, of \$600 due from the Christian Orphanage for 1948-50, and upon vote it was referred to the Orphanage for its disposal.
- 4. Henry E. Robinson read a letter from Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Sellars, of Burlington, N. C., in which they offered as a gift for the use of the Convention and its various activities the valuable Moonelon property situated in Boone Station Township, Alamance County, and consisting of approximately 20 acres of land on which there are: a lake, swimming pool, 7-room cabin, outdoor kitchen and caretaker's house. Mr. Robinson stated that the procedure for passing the title to the Convention is as follows:

a one-fourth undivided interest to be deeded immediately, and a one-fourth undivided interest to be deeded each successive year until the complete title is vested in the Convention. It was further stipulated that the wills of the donors would be redrawn so that in case of death of either, the Convention would inherit the ungiven portion.

The Board passed the following vote with regard to Moonelon: That we accept the gracious gift of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Sellers of the Moonelon property in accordance with the terms stipulated in the letter read by Rev. Henry E. Robinson and with a deep sense of gratitude. The Secretary was instructed to notify the donors of the acceptance of this gift by the Board on behalf of the Southern Convention and to express its grateful appreciation. It was also voted that a committee of seven be appointed by the President to have control and supervision of the Moonelon property until the next meeting of the Board. The committee constituted was Henry E. Robinson, Mrs. W. E. Wisseman, L. E. Smith, John G. Truitt, Stanley C. Harrell, George D. Colclough and Wm. T. Scott.

Note: The title to the Moonelon property is in the name of the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, Inc., and the deeds may be found in the office of the Registrar of Deeds for Alamance County in Book 198, pages 362-364, and Book 205, pages 170-173.

5. Upon recommendation of the Finance Committee, the Board adopted the Treasurer's report of the fiscal year ending December 31, 1950, as audited by Owen and Hogan, C.P.A., Burlington, North Carolina.

The third meeting was held at the First Congregational Christian Church, Henderson, North Carolina, October 16, 1951, with 16 members, the Superintendent, the Education Secretary present.

- The Board passed a vote of appreciation for the splendid services being rendered by Dr. Scott and Miss Coghill.
- 2. Dr. Jesse H. Dollar made a brief address on "Stewardship Opportunities," which was timely and stimulating.

It was voted that the Stewardship Commission of the Convention be requested to meet with the Finance Committee to work out plans for a greater emphasis on Stewardship within the Convention.

 A report of the special committee on Moonelon was given by Henry E. Robinson, including the presentation of architect's plans picturing the future development of this property.

It was voted that the committee be authorized to proceed to acquire a piece of property adjoining our property, essential to the future development of Moonelon, at a price not to exceed \$500. It was voted also that the committee present its plans to the next session of the Convention, requesting authority for further development of the plans. It was voted that the Committee on Moonelon be authorized to raise funds up to \$1,500 in order to liquidate current obligations, pay the purchase price for the additional property and to provide necessary operating expenses until the Convention meets.

4. Dr. F. C. Lester presented a vexing problem which exists in the Western North Carolina Conference wherein an unauthorized pastor continues to serve our churches in violation of our rules, despite the counsel and protests of our leaders.

On motion, it was voted that a joint letter by the President of the Southern Convention and the Presidents of the Conferences, setting forth the principles of our government as related to this matter be sent to all of our churches.

The Secretary read a letter from Dr. John G. Truitt, Superintendent, written on behalf of the Trustees of the Christian Orphanage relative to the item of \$600.00 due the Convention Fund on the 1948-50 apportionment for the support of the Convention office, in which it was stated that inasmuch as the Orphanage had assumed an additional payment of \$300.00 annually to *The Christian Sun*, as agreed in conference with Supt. Scott and Dr. S. C. Harrell, that the matter was "settled and dropped."

On motion, the Board voted that a joint letter be written by the Chairman of the Finance Committee and Secretary of the Convention stating that this was a misundersanding on the part of the Orphanage Trustees, the committee having no authority to settle on this basis.

- Upon recommendation of the Chairman of the Board of Publications, the Board authorized the Treasurer to pay \$750.00 on the loan from the Eastern Virginia Ministerial Education Fund.
 - Invitations were received from Durham and Burlington churches to hold the fortieth biennial session of the Convention in 1952.
- Upon motion it was voted to hold the 1952 session at the Durham church and to
 express through Rev. Henry E. Robinson to the Burlington church our appreciation for extending the invitation to the Convention.
- Upon authorization, President Stevens appointed a program committee for the approaching session of the Convention as follows: Stevens, Dollar, O'Neill, Harrell, House, Scott.
- 9. Upon motion, the President appointed a committee on Revisions and Amendments as follows: Andes, Mrs. W. E. Wisseman, Lester.

It was also voted that the Committee on Revisions be instructed to give consideration to the question of reprinting the *Manual*, and that it bring recommendations to the Convention.

- Upon motion and vote, Supt. Wm. T. Scott was nominated for re-election as Superintendent of the Convention for the biennium 1952-54.
- 11. Rev. A. Lanson Granger, Jr., was elected a member of the Board of Christian Education to take the place of Rev. Herbert G. Council, Jr., who has removed his residence from the Convention.
- 12. Upon motion, it was voted that we appropriate the sum of \$150.00 annually toward the expenses of the Southeast Regional Meeting, and that the same be paid at the rate of \$75.00 semi-annually.
- 13. On motion, it was voted that the Nominating Committee bring recommendations regarding the election of delegates to the General Council meeting at Claremont, California, in June, 1952, to the attention of the Executive Committee and that the Executive Committee of the Board shall have power to elect such delegates.

The fourth meeting was held at Elon College, North Carolina, February 26, 1952, with 15 members, the Superintendent and Educational Secretary present.

- 1. The Board approved and adopted the action of the Executive Committee at a meeting held on November 20, 1951, as follows:
 - (1) To authorize the effective date of the group insurance plan with the Home Life Insurance Company, as of December 20, 1951, provided sufficient funds are received from the Conferences, churches and agencies to pay the first premium; the decision to rest with the Insurance Committee appointed by the Executive Board, consisting of Robinson, O'Neill, Truitt and Scott.

Note: The effective date of the group insurance plan was December 31, 1951. The plan provides for \$2,000.00 life insurance for pastors under 65 years of age, \$1,000.00 for pastors over 65 years of age, and \$1,000.00 for other employees certified by Convention, Conferences, churches and agencies, provided premiums are paid by Convention, Conferences, churches or agencies at the rate of \$49.44 annually. The plan provides for double indemnity, and gives hospitalization and surgical benefits to the above persons. Any of the above persons may have dependent hospitalization and surgical benefits by their payment of premium of \$22.86 semi-annually in advance.

- (2) That the 1951 operating budget for the Convention be effective for 1952 until the next meeting of the Executive Board.
- 2. Upon motion, it was voted that the reports of the Superintendent and Educational Secretary be circulated at least quarterly to members of the Executive Board and that the matter of reporting to *The Christian Sun* be left to the discretion of the Superintendent and Educational Secretary.
- 3. Upon motion, the statement of the auditors, Owen and Hogan, C.P.A., Burlington, North Carolina, covering the period of January 1, 1951, to December 31, 1951, be received and referred to the Finance Committee for their reporting to the Southern Convention at its next session.
- 4. The President of the Convention welcomed to the meeting Supt. J. T. Stanley of the Convention of the South, and Dr. Stanley U. North, Director of Church Extension and Evangelism, Board of Home Missions, New York. Dr. North spoke to the Board on "The Need of Capital Funds by the Church Building Department."

Upon motion, it was voted that we express to Dr. North our appreciation for his presentation of this matter, which we consider of grave importance at this time, and that we ask him to present to the proper body our interest and hope to cooperate in the effort to bring relief to our Church Building Society.

- 5. Upon motion, it was voted that we adopt an operating budget of \$20,000 for the calendar year 1952.
- 6. Upon motion, it was voted that the Board acknowledge and receive with interest the report of the committee on Finance for 1952-54, and that we look with interest upon the recommendation for the employment of a secretary of Stewardship and Evangelism, and that we commend it to the Southern Convention for its favorable consideration.
- The special Insurance Committee consisting of O'Neill, Harrell, Truitt, Robinson, and Supt. Scott be continued.
- 8. Henry E. Robinson, Chairman of the Moonelon Committee, reported that four additional acres of land had been purchased from W. F. and Luther Andrews in a deed dated October 15, 1951, and recorded in Alamance County Register of Deeds in Book 205, pages 172-173, for the sum of \$500.00.
- 9. Upon motion, it was voted to instruct the Treasurer of the Southern Convention to carry the deficit in the Moonelon account until money is secured to retire the

Dr. John G. Truitt, Superintendent of the Christian Orphanage, presented a statement that a chapel had been donated to the Orphanage by the members of the W. K. Holt family, and that it is to be called the Holt Memorial Chapel.

- 10. Upon motion, it was voted to ask the Finance Committee to recommend to the Southern Convention that the Sustaining Fund be channeled through the Southern Convention office to Elon College and that this fund be used by the college as it may see fit.
- 11. Dr. Jesse H. Dellar, the chairman of the special committee appointed by the Executive Board to study the matter of rotating terms of office for Trustees of Elon College and the Christian Orphanage, reported that his committee had made a thorough study of this matter and that it recommends that the terms of office remain as they are now, without limitation.
- 12. Upon motion, it was voted to authorize the Ministerial Loan Fund Committee to cancel the loan made to Rev. W. B. Fuller years ago and report the same to the Southern Convention. This action was taken in view of illness and misfortune of Mr. Fuller
- 13. Upon motion, it was voted that the Executive Board should hold its next meeting at lunch in Durham, North Carolina, on April 29.
- 14. Upon motion, it was voted that the Superintendent, the President and Secretary of the Convention prepare the report of the Executive Board to be presented to the Convention and have it ready for approval of the Executive Board at the meeting on April 29.

The Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Superintendent, and all employed staff of the Convention are bonded through the Board of Home Missions of Congregational Christian Churches, New York, Fidelity Bond—Aetna No. IF663R—Blanket Position Bond \$100,000 indemnity each, premiums paid to June 30, 1953.

In October, 1951, as instructed by the vote of the Convention of 1950, amendment to the Convention charter was completed. This amendment is in Certificate No. 65542, signed by Thad Eure, Secretary of the State of North Carolina, under date of July 13, 1951. The official title of the Convention is The Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, Inc.

The Board reviewed the minutes of the sessions held during the biennium and authorized the President, Secretary, and Superintendent to prepare this summarization.

At each meeting of the Board held during the course of the biennium, reports have been received in detail from the Superintendent, the Educational Secretary, the Treasurer of the Convention Fund, the Convention Office, and from all of the officers of the Convention. Copies of these reports are in the hands of the Secretary and may be examined by any member of the Convention upon request. Also detailed minutes of each session of the Executive Board are on record in the minute book of the Executive Board, which is a permanent record, in the hands of the Convention Secretary, and may be examined upon request by anyone desiring to examine such records.

The foregoing actions of the Board are a summary of the significant actions which the Board has taken. Other actions are included in the minutes mentioned above. At each session of the Board the Board has also received reports from the various committees of the Convention and has counseled with said committees with reference to their work.

The Treasurer's report carries the expenditures for Convention-employed personnel, promotion, administration, and Convention Office expenditures.

THE SOUTHERN CONVENTION

REPORT OF CONVENTION SUPERINTENDENT.

THE STATE OF OUR CHURCHES.

Materially—There are 197 churches in the Convention, of which four are listed as inactive. During the biennium, three new churches were added: Burlington, "Beverly Hills"; Fayetteville, "Eutaw Community"; Greensboro, "Calvary." One church—Lynchburg—was lost.

We have a membership of 33,923, or a loss of 807 members during the biennium.

There are 70 parsonages serving 88 pastoral units. Six of these parsonages have been added during the past two years—Cypress Chapel; Norfolk, "Second"; Beulah-New Hope; Hank's Chapel; Liberty; Union (Va.), and there is one new parsonage now under construction—Pleasant Grove (W. N. C.).

Financially, we have had perhaps our best biennium. During the two-year period, our churches raised a total of \$2,050,766.00. Of this amount, \$205,527.00 was contributed to the apportionment, out of a total of \$328,258 for missionary and benevolent purposes. This figure, of course, does not include many gifts of our church people to Elon College and the Christiaan Orphanage for special purposes. For all current expenses, our churches raised \$1,722,508.00. Of this amount, \$862,712 was reported raised for building improvements and on building debts.

During the biennium new buildings have been erected by Franklin; Norfolk, "Second"; Union (So.); Windsor, of E. Va.; Ebenezer, Mt. Gilead, Wake Chapel, of E. N. C.; Antioch (R.), Pleasant Ridge, Randleman, of W. N. C.; Apple's Chapel, Concord, Bethlehem, Burlington, "Beverly Hills" and "First," Gibsonville, Greensboro, "First" and "Palm Street." Other churches have completed buildings begun the previous biennium. Nearly a score of churches during the two-year period have made major property improvements. For instance, during the 1950-51 Conference year, 122 churches reported property improvement. This same report shows a total local church property valuation of \$6,257,745.00, exclusive of the valuable plants of Elon College, the Christian Orphanage and Moonelon.

In a study of our national Congregational Christian Yearbook for 1950, there are some interesting comparisons of the Southern Convention with the other 45 State Conferences and Conventions of our General Council for that year. In this study we found that the Southern Convention ranked 11th in the number of members, 16th in the number of member accessions that year, 8th in Sunday School enrollment, 7th in the number of young people enrolled in youth work, 7th in apportionment gifts (for instance, we gave \$4.56 per member, while the denomination as a whole gave \$3.13 per member), 10th in Home Expenses (\$23.79 per member, whereas the denomination average was \$25,80), 24th in average pastors' salary and 17th in local church property value. We are the only Conference or Convention owning and operating a college or orphanage. The Christian Sun is the only weekly publication of our denomination.

If we could stop here, we could be justly proud of ourselves—and honestly boast a little: But most of these things are at best only means to an end. The real test comes in the answer to the question, "To what spiritual purpose all these things?"

SPIRITUALLY: It is here that we cannot boast! We have a well-meaning and devoted ministry and laity. On the whole, we are as good as those of any denomination. But are we not weighed in the balance and found wanting—

1. In Evangelism?

Consider our low evangelistic index for the 1950-51 Conference year. It was 2.65—that is, for every 100 members of our churches we brought only 2 2/3 new members on Confession of Faith during the whole year! (In the ten-year period, 1940-50, our evangelistic index was 2.70 whereas during the same period, our population in North Carolina and Virginia increased 21.4 per cent!) From 1940 to 1950 we increased our membership by 14.5 per cent, or a net gain of 2,334 members in 10 years.

Maybe our lack of Christian zeal, concern, passion for souls, real love for Christ, and a fundamental belief in His saving grace are the underlying causes; or maybe we have just lacked the application of effective methods. At the end of the biennium we show 807 less members of our churches than we reported two years ago. During 1950-51 Conference year, 55 of our churches reported no new members on Confession

of Faith, and 110 others added 9 or fewer on Confession of Faith. Thirty-eight (38) of our churches in 1950-51 failed to receive a member on Confession or by letter!

Recommendation—That we make Evangelism a major emphasis during the 1952-54 biennium, earnestly trying to enrich our spiritual life and to reach the goal we set for ourselves six years ago—one new member per month for each 100 present members of our churches.

2. IN CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP?

We raised a lot of dollars during the biennium—two million of them. But of those two million, 85 per cent we raised for our own comforts—better and more comfortable church buildings, etc., and 15 per cent of this amount we devoted to the Christian witness beyond our own local church doors and programs. Get it—85 per cent for ourselves, and 15 per cent for others. The Southern Baptist Church has scores of churches giving 50 per cent for others, and using 50 per cent for their local church program. Do we love our Lord less than they, or do we love ourselves more than they? Is it not entirely possible that our low evangelistic index is closely related to our poor practice of Christian Stewardship? Have we been "Careful and troubled about many things," neglecting the "one thing needful?" Will not persons born of the spirit and practicing the scriptural injunctions of Christian Stewardship lay their substance upon the altar along with their time and talents in their Christian witness? Do not these facts and truths point to us the way we ought to go during the coming biennium?

Recommendation—That this session of the Convention adopt the courageous program projected by the Finance Committee—including the employment of a Secretary of Stewardship and Evangelism.

3. In Church Extension?

During the past biennium we have organized two new churches and received another (an already established church) in our fellowship. During the past 10 years we have established less than 5 new churches, and those 10 years have marked the most amazing population turnover and growth in our history as a nation. New communities have been born, and cities have grown in leaps and bounds. The population growth has confounded the sociologists, and the prospective growth for the next 10 years is even greater. Yet, we have lacked the will and we have not found the way to hold up our end of the Protestant responsibility for the winning of America to Christ.

The size of our churches tell us plainly that in several instances our churches are becoming smaller and weaker year by year. This is due in large measure to population changes, and many of these churches are going to die. We now have 28 churches with less than 50 members, and there are 77 with less than 100 members!

If we are to preserve our strength, we must do our part in bearing the witness. Yes, no doubt other denominations will go into the unchurched communities of our two states if we do not! But in our idleness, we are liable to lose our souls!

Recommendation—That we reaffirm our goal in Church Extension adopted six years ago—one new church per year in each of our five Conferences.

OUR INSTITUTIONS AND THE CHRISTIAN SUN.

- 1. ELON COLLEGE since 1889 has been the center of our church life. She has furnished perhaps 75 per cent of our pastors, scores of trained lay leaders, and inspired hundreds of others through her influence. It would be a dark picture we would see if it had not been for Elon College. Our college, like all other church-related and supported colleges, is having a hard time of it financially. What America does with her Christian colleges may well chart the course of our nation. We, as a church, are dependent upon the fortunes of Elon. Likewise, Elon is dependent upon our financial and human support. Give Elon College your financial help. Send your sons and daughters to her halls of learning and inspiration.
- 2. The Christian Orphanage—Our church fathers saw the care of helpless childhood as a part of the Christian witness. Hence the founding of our Orphanage. There are circumstances of the broken home and the orphaned child to which we as a church dare not turn a deaf or an unconcerned eye. The children committed to our

church present an opportunity for investment in the future by surrounding these children with Christian influence, training and essential physical care.

- 3. MOONELON—Through the generosity of Mr. and Mrs. William W. Sellers of our First Church, Burlington, a Convention Center of nearly 30 acres of land and essential equipment has been given to the Convention. This Center can become a place of inspiration and training for our youth in summer conferences, retreats, etc., as well as a Center for our laymen and women. There is need for additional equipment. We hope our laymen will interest themselves in the development of this place of opportunity.
- 4. The Christian Sun since 1844 has been a beacon light to our churches and members. The last remaining weekly periodical of our Congregational Christian denomination in America, The Christian Sun fills a unique place in our fellowship. We have tried to promote its circulation. While the paper is on a more sound financial basis than two years ago—(we are operating without a deficit, due to the apportionment and the subsidies from Elon Coliege, the Orphanage, and the Mission Board)—we are printing and mailing less than 2,000 copies weekly. Of this number, perhaps less than 1,600 copies are going into the homes of our more than 10,000 families! Church people who read The Christian Sun support the church. An increased subscription list of readers of The Christian Sun would strengthen our fellowship and would provide added resources for our Christian witness.

OUR MINISTRY.

In the Conferences of the Convention there are 120 ordained ministers, 10 ministers with limited ordination, and 19 licentiates. Two ministers of other denominations are serving our churches. We have six ministerial students in the Bible Class, four of whom are enrolled at Elon College and one is enrolled at seminary. We have 15 ordained ministers and licentiates studying at seminary or at Elon College. Of this number, 11 are already serving churches as pastors.

With only 21 students preparing for the Christian ministry, most of whom are already serving churches, it may be plainly seen that our supply of ministers is likely to continue to be inadequate. To supply our churches with pastors now and in the future, we should recruit and enroll each year at Elon College 15 young men for the ministry. At least 10 should be graduating at Elon College and five from seminary each year if we are to have a supply of pastors for our churches.

During the biennium seven new pastors have come into our Convention—Bozarth, Brickhouse, Galt, Linder, Powell, Ratzell and White. These men are taking their places amongst us as faithful servants of the church. We lament the loss by death of four of our active ministers: W. Stanley Carne, Ben Joe Earp, Luther B. Grice and J. Frank Morgan. The Committee on Memoirs will record others of the ministers who have passed away during the biennium.

It is a source of inspiration and encouragement to your pastors to know the churches are more and more concerned that adequate salaries should be paid, that parsonages are being erected or purchased. The security of our pastors has been greatly strengthened in the Group Insurance Plan for Pastors and their Dependents we were able to effect during the past year. All of these, though material, have given the pastors a new sense of responsibility and devotion.

Recommendation—That we ask our Laymen's Fellowship, Woman's Convention and Youth Fellowship to lay upon the hearts and minds of our choice young men the cause of the Christian ministry.

OUR AUXILIARY ORGANIZATIONS, BOARDS AND COMMITTEES.

Our Woman's Missionary Convention continues its excellent work; our Youth Fellowship increases in number and effectiveness; our Laymen's Fellowship is getting beyond the "rallying" stage and is looking for a job to do. Our Boards and Committees are taking seriously their responsibilities and are increasing their effectiveness.

Recommendation—An annual or biennial planning conference of Boards, Committees and officials of the Convention to study together our total objectives and plans for the year or biennium; fix calendar of essential events; meet by Boards and Committees for developing respective plans as related to the whole.

WE HAVE TRIED TO SERVE.

There is not a part in the above picture of our Convention in which I, as your Superintendent, have not had some responsibility. I have worked for the Mission Board as its Executive Secretary; the Board of Publications as its subscription agent for The Christian Sun and compiler of The Christian Annual; the Board of Superannuation as its counselor and contact person with the national Division of Ministerial Relief and with ministers and widows in need; the Laymen's Fellowship, the Woman's Convention, etc. It is the privilege and responsibility of the Superintendent to represent the Convention in denominational and inter-denominational meetings. He prepares the statistics for the National Yearbook, and he is the contact person of the Board of Home Missions, the American Board and other national agencies in the Convention.

I have shared responsibility in scores of meetings of committees of Conferences and the Convention. I have tried to answer every call of the churches and pastors. Hundreds of visits to churches and pastors have been made—sometimes to preach, conduct communion or perform baptisms for student pastors, consecrate or baptize a pastor's child, raise money, conduct a revival, conduct a stewardship institute and every-member canvass, help obtain a pastor, help launch a building program, break ground for a new church or parsonage, burn a mortgage, consecrate or dedicate a church or parsonage, organize a new church, promote the organization of laymen's work, or just to counsel with the church or pastor.

I have tried to promote every interest of the Church and Convention, particularly the apportionment giving. Hours upon hours have gone into endless details—many of them seemingly useless, yet important in the total program of the local churches, Conferences and Convention. Hundreds of letters must be written concerning the various phases of our work. Reports to and contact with our denominational program go through my office, claiming my time and concern. Counseling ministerial students is a joy and service rendered. This is a part of the order of the day of the Superintendent. There is never a dull moment, but there are many tired ones! Physical strength and time are not sufficient to fulfill all the calls. We struggle for time for creative thought and planning, but often we are disappointed or fall short of our best because this time cannot be found. Yet there is a joy in serving the fellowship. We are trying to do our best for you and to give our best, always mindful of our failures and shortcomings. Pray for us that we may be faithful, devoted and effective in the trust you have committed to us.

I wish to pay special tribute to the unselfish and long hours of service of my colleagues, Miss Pattie Lee Coghill, and the Convention Office staff. No one not having worked on the Convention staff can know the numerous demands upon your employees. Likewise, I am grateful for the trust and comradeship of our wonderful pastors, the scores of devoted lay people, the consideration of President Smith and Elon College. Without all these, and many not mentioned, our humble labor would be much poorer indeed.

May God give us wisdom to see Christ's plan for our great Convention, and with that wisdom may He give us concern, courage and resources for the fulfillment of his plans through us in our time.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY.

Since there is not enough space to make this a statistical report nor an accurate account of the use of my time during the past biennium, I shall attempt to summarize activities in which I have assisted.

Women's Work.

A large amount of my time is taken up with Women's Work which I enjoy and think important. I have attended all Board meetings of the Southern Convention

women, assisted with the planning and program of the School of Missions, attended the biennial meeting in Norfolk, and have served as Chairman of Literature. As Literature Chairman, I have, with the aid of the Conference Literature Chairmen, prepared the program packet each year and promoted its use in the women's societies. All of this requires days of preparation and correspondence throughout the year. Our office attempts to meet all requests for routine and special literature, and in addition mimeographs reports, programs such as Thank Offering, Cradle Roll, and others sent out by Convention officers; as well as letters sent by the various departments. One of the most interesting Convention-wide activities during the biennium was the trip to the United Nations. Twenty-three women, representing all five Conferences, went on the trip which included, in addition to the United Nations, special meetings arranged by the denominational Legislative Committee in Washington and a visit to our National headquarters in New York.

On the Conference level, I have atended each annual meeting of the women during the biennium and all district rallies with the exception of three this year—a total of 17; attended at least one Board meeting of each Conference; and our office has mimeographed annual reports and letters sent out by the department superintendents.

I have visited local women's groups for speeches and book reviews, to take missionary speakers and so forth; and have assisted in the organization of five new societies, three of these within the past month; and have attempted to answer all requests which have come to the office.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK.

A report of the Southern Convention Youth Fellowship is included elsewhere. I have worked with the young people in arranging two spring planning retreats, met with the officers from time to time, arranged for our group to be represented by one adult and four young people at the National meeting of the Pilgrim Fellowship in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, two years ago; provided news items for the Editor of Youth Page, prepared a young people's packet each year and worked with them in their missionary projects. The outstanding missionary activity of the Southern Convention young people has been the bringing over of a student from the Philippines to study for two years in this country. Jose Dabuet is in his first year at Princeton Seminary and the young people raised the entire amount, \$1,250.00, the first year and are now raising the other half. A nominating committee made up of two representatives from each of the five Conferences have nominated officers for the next biennium. Plans are being made to send representatives to the National Pilgrim Fellowship meeting in California this summer.

One big time consumer is young people's work in the Conferences. Each fall, the five Conferences hold a rally on successive Sundays. In 1950, these were held on the five Sundays in October and widely advertised as "A Month of Sundays for Young People." All Conference young people's groups have held at least one other rally each year and some Conferences two or three additional rallies. In most instances, this has meant preliminary planning meetings to set up the programs.

The two big events for the past two springs have been the State-wide Young People's Rallies in Virginia, held at our church in Richmond; and in North Carolina, at Elon College. More than 1,000 young people attended the two this spring and all have felt them highly successful.

Spring and summer each year have brought committee meetings, planning conferences, programs, preparation of posters, and general promotion of camps and conferences. In addition to the Young People's Conference at Elon College, the Junior High Camp in North Carolina, the Valley of Virginia Camp, the following new camps were added: The Junior High Camp in Eastern Virginia, a Camp for Junior boys and girls, and a Family Camp.

Another summer activity is the selection, training, and placing of Student Summer Service workers. Last summer there were nine students who assisted in this work and a special feature was a Youth Caravan made up of three young men including Timothy Chang, who spent the entire summer visiting our churches throughout the Convention. A small group of young people participated in a week-end Work Camp at Franklinton Institute, near the end of June.

This is a good place to report Vacation Bible School work. Last year the 50th Anniversary of the Vacation Bible School Movement was observed. I am pleased with the number of churches conducting schools. We assist through the Board of Christian Education in the selection of text books and the purchase of these books; also providing workers where needed.

Student Work—Last fall with Dr. Bryant Drake, National Student Secretary, meetings were arranged and held for Congregational Christian students in the following places: Durham (Duke and the University of North Carolina), Greensboro, Raleigh, and Elon College. This led to a conference of Congregational Christian students held over the past weekend at Elon. This was the first conference of this kind and while the attendance was small, it was a representative one and a very worthwhile meeting. In addition, I have met with the student group in Greensboro from time to time at their regular meetings as well as assisted in their program planning. I found it a very stimulating and interesting experience to participate in Religious Emphasis Week at Woman's College this year.

LEADERSHIP TRAINING.

Leadership training is growing in the Convention and we have been experimenting with several different types. We do some interdenominational leadership training schools and should do more. Area denominational schools with three or more teachers have been held in a number of places during the past two years. One of our most effective forms of leadership education has been Pilgrim Series Institutes for churches using our denominational literature. These have been more successful when held in local churches We hope to have an increasing amount of this type of leadership education. There have also been a number of institute type of training programs such as an afternoon on Worship in one church and a One-Day Conference on Children's Work with Miss Leila Anderson, of the National Division of Christian Education, for the Eastern North Carolina churches; and district and conference-wide Sunday afternoon and evening meetings. I feel personally that we should experiment with all kinds of leadership training and do much more than we are doing at the present and use more people for leadership.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Visual Aids—More of our churches are using Visual Aids, and film-strips are being added to our Film Library. Four film-strips on Family Life were purchased by the Southern Convention women recently. Three copies of the feature film for next year, "More for Peace," have just arrived and will be available for use in the fall. The distribution of these films requires a lot of time and is being done by Ruth Dunn, who is invaluable in our office in so many ways, and I should like to take this opportunity of expressing my gratitude for all she does.

College Day Observance—Programs and other materials; speakers and singers from the College Choir were provided for College Day Observance for our churches during the past two years.

Interdenominational Work—I am convinced that we do far too little of this since our denomination is in a position to do cooperative work and it is a part of our Christian belief. I have attended a few committee meetings set up by the North Carolma Council of Churches and the annual meeting of the Council of Churches and the Council of Church Women. I also attended a meeting of the State Directors of Religious Education set up by the Virginia Council of Churches and have arranged for representatives at other meetings.

Meetings Outside of the Area—Included the Mid-winter meeting held at Grand Rapids, Michigan, January, 1951, and the Southeast Regional meeting held at Avon Park, Florida, this spring.

Meetings Within the Convention—Meetings of the Executive Board of the Southern Convention; regular meetings of the Mission Board, occasional meetings at Franklinton Institute, and all annual Conference meetings. In addition to the Mission Board meetings, I have attended a number of committee meetings to plan for the observance of Mission Emphasis Period and have arranged itineraries for missionaries such as Miss Angie Crew, Miss Edith Preusse, and others as well as Board Secretaries and other speakers for Conferences, Rallies, and other meetings. I attempt

in field work and in the office to assist in any way I can with all of the institutions of the Convention and to send items for publication through the regular departments of

The Christian Sun and directly to the editor.

A bulletin for Sunday School Superintendents and other workers in our churches was prepared last fall. I need to do more of this kind of religious education. On the other hand, every Conference, Camp, Rally, committee meeting, or packet of literature requires hours of preparation, letters before and after, so that office work continues to be our greatest problem. It is impossible to list here visits to local churches. I have traveled at least 34,000 miles during the biennium.

I want to express to you, the members of our churches in the Southern Convention, my appreciation for your every courtesy as I travel among you; for all your cooperation in our common enterprises, and for all the good work you do in the Conference and Convention, in addition to a heavy load in your local church. It is a great place PATTIE LEE COGHILL,

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

Your Board of Christian Education has endeavored to keep pace with the ongoing life of the church. Special divisions of the Board are charged with responsibilities, such as the work of Children, Young People, and Adults.

Much work is done by our Educational Secretary, Miss Pattie Lee Coghill. She, with your Board, has attempted some new projects the last two years:

- 1. State-wide Pilgrim Fellowship Meetings have been held with large attendance in each state. The presidents of the Conference Pilgrim Fellowship groups have worked extensively to make these meetings successful.
- 2. Sunday School Superintendents have met in all Conferences, except the Valley Conference. Promoted by the presidents of the Sunday School Conventions, these meetings of the superintendents have proven of great value. Much commendation should go to the Presidents of the Sunday School Conventions, for their constant work and meetings. This has increased the value of our Sunday School Conventions.
- 3. The program for college and university students is not as far advanced as we had hoped. Several student conferences have been held and others are in the planning stage.
- 4. Elon College is our college and we urge the continued support of each church to this church college Students from our churches as well as financial help are needed.
- 5. A Youth Caravan was established last summer to visit local church youth groups and youth meetings.
- 6. Visual aids are becoming increasingly important. Films have been purchased and loaned out to the churches. An attempt has been made to place slide and film strip projectors in designated areas.

Many other activities claimed our attention: Vacation Church Schools, Leadership Training Schools, summer camps and conferences.

On motion it was voted that the report of the Board of Publications be adopted but that action on the proposed budget be deferred until later.

REPORT OF BOARD OF PUBLICATIONS.

Financially your church paper is in a better condition than has been the case for several years. This is due to the increase in the subscription rate and to the apportionment funds set aside by each conference and church in the past biennium. Current expenses have been met and a payment on the loan from the Eastern Virginia Ministerial Loan Fund has been made in the amount of \$750.00.

As of March 10, 1952, the subscription list was 1,804 paid subscribers and 43 exchange copies. Since January 1, 1951, 616 subscriptions expired and were not renewed. This is an unhealthy situation and should be remedied. Every effort is made by the Convention office to secure renewals. To your Board it appears that the fault lies in the local church and more effective presentation of the need for *The Christian Sun* to families at that level would assure greater interest and increased subscriptions.

The Christian Sun is not "just another magazine." It is the voice of the Institutions, Boards, Conferences, Offices and local churches of the Southern Convention. We admit that as a "voice" it has certain faults and limitations. We are eager to correct them that it may become more effective. We have approximately 10,000 families in the Convention. Less than 20 per cent of those homes, at the present time, have an opportunity to read of the work the churches are striving to accomplish. If you have constructive suggestions for content, format, or increasing subscription strength we will be happy to consider those suggestions and to use those that will be effective. In direct ratio to your increased interest, support, and effort the volume of the "voice" will increase. We believe that The Christian Sun can make a greater contribution in every area of our church life but the burden of responsibility for securing the interest of the people of our churches rests with the effective presentation of The Sun by the local church.

We submit the following recommendations:

- 1. That *The Christian Sun* continue to be a sixteen page weekly publication at the present subscription rates, the content and format to be modified as the editor, managing editor and chairman of the Board of Publications, at the direction of the entire board, deem advisable.
- 2. That the ministers and laymen of the several conferences be uregd to enter into a concerted effort to secure a wider subscription on the part of our people. Those churches already having agents for The Sun are to be commended and the practice of a local agent in the church is presented as a step in the right direction.

However, the responsibility can not and should not be delegated to any one individual but should be shared by a group large enough to adequately cover the entire church.

- 3. That the local churches take a greater interest and a more active part in reporting events of special importance in their local program. Many of our churches are too modest—they never report the interesting and effective work they are doing. Send your reports to the editor—he will make every effort to use your material for the benefit of our whole fellowship.
- 4. That the Convention assure *The Christian Sun* apportionment of \$2,000.00. Last year we received approximately \$1,600.00 from this source. If your paper is to continue to operate without a deficit, the entire \$2,000.00 is needed. We suggest that the Convention underwrite the difference between the apportionment receipts and the \$2,000.00 so that we have a firm subsidy. We have just incurred a 20 per cent increase in the production cost of *The Christian Sun*. That increase was necessary and reasonable. In order to meet our increased costs we must be sure of our income. Every effort will be made to secure more subscriptions but your Board feels that a firm subsidy is essential.
- 5. That the Resolutions Committee of the Southern Convention be requested to present citations to the following men for their long and excellent service to the Convention and its churches through the services they render in *The Christian Sun*.
 - To Dr. H. S. Hardcastle who has for more than 25 years rendered invaluable service in the weekly presentation of the Sunday School lessons prepared for *The Christian Sun*. His keen comment, deep understanding and timely suggestions have given greater insight to many of our people.

To Mr. John T. Kernodle for the more than 30 years of careful and continuous effort as the publishing agent for *The Chrsitian Sun*. Through good times and bad he has sought to serve his church in an effective manner. As Managing Editor he has made an invaluable contribution not only to the paper but to the life of the church as a whole.

To Dr. Robert Lee House for the 12 years that he has served as editor of the paper With real Christian concern and courage he has sought to present materials that will be truly productive for the church. He has with fairness and impartially presented questions of almost every nature to our churches in an effort to bring them into deeper mutual understanding and fellowship.

We believe that recognition of long and faithful service for these men should be made at this meeting of the Convention.

The Board presents the following proposed budget in place of the budget as recommended by the Finance Committee. Our proposal is made necessary by the fact that there has been an increase in the cost of production, that certain expenses with regard to travel of the editor are necessary, that certain office expenses with regard to mailing and renewal notices should be cared for by *The Sun* rather than by the Convention office. The budget as we propose it shows an increase of \$900.00 over that proposed by the Finance Committee.

The report of the Finance Committee was read by Dr. S. C. Harrell and, on motion, it was voted to consider the report by numbered paragraphs.

The first paragraph (unnumbered) containing the Budget for the biennium, was read and adopted.

Paragraph No. 2 was adopted, and details referred to the Executive Board with power.

Paragraph No. 3 was adopted.

Paragraph No. 4. On motion, it was voted that the proposed budget submitted by the Board of Publications be substituted.

Paragraphs Nos. 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13 were adopted.

A motion that the report as a whole and as amended be adopted was then voted. The report follows:

2. The Mission Board approached the Finance Committee asking for authority to raise special funds for its Home Mission projects, with the suggestion that an individual might be employed to conduct this solicitation.

It is the considered judgment of the Finance Committee that in view of the financial needs of the total work of the Convention, its Boards and Institutions, a broader base of a program of Christian Stewardship would bring about a more wholesome and continuous response to the need for additional funds than could be realized through any special financial drive or solicitation.

Accordingly, provision is made in the budget recommended for the 1952-54 biennium for the employment of a Stewardship and Evangelism Secretary. We believe that such a step by the Convention now is imperative and would result in new Christian vitality and increasing giving.

3. We recommend an Annual Operating Budget of \$27,500 effective January 1, 1953, for Convention Leadership, Promotion, Stewardship and Evangelism Secretary, and the Convention Office, to be administered by the Executive Board of the Convention.

It is apparent that a \$400 operating deficit is present, but it is hoped to compensate for that by additional subscriptions.

It is recommended that boards and institutions pay the amounts specified for *The* Christian Sun and the Operating Budget of the Convention Office in monthly installments; and that appropriations from boards and institutions begin January 1, 1953, and run through the fiscal year ending December 31, 1954.

5. Elon College has made commendable progress and advancement in recent years. Its expanding program calls for larger and continued financial support.

We recommend that in addition to an annual Apportionment of \$15,000 for Elon College that the Sustaining Fund for Elon College of \$1.00 per member per year (approximately \$34,000) be continued for the 1952-54 biennium; that the Sustaining Fund be raised during the College Period, and that it constitute a ceiling on special funds to be raised from the church constituency of the Convention for current purposes; that Sustaining Fund contributions continue to be channeled through the Southern Convention Office and credited to the churches in a special column of The Annual; that this be a cooperative effort, participated in by the College Administration, the Convention, conferences, churches and church officials; that the Convention appoint a committee to work for the Convention in cooperation with the officials of the organizations named above, to promote the Sustaining Fund plan throughout the Convention; and that, effective immediately, the Convention treasurer pay all Sustaining Fund receipts to Elon College to be used by the College as it sees fit. We recommend that each local church set up a committee to promote the Sustaining Fund.

We further recommend that the Convention approve the request of the Board of Trustees of Elon College to increase the Expansion Program of the College from \$2,000,000 to \$2,500,000.

6. The Christian Orphanage. We recommend that in addition to an annual apportionment of \$15,000 for the Christian Orphanage that the Convention authorize the Orphanage to raise during the Orphanage period "An Authorized Special" of \$25,000 annually from the Convention constituency for building rehabilitation and current budget purposes, such "Authorized Special" gifts from Convention churches, organizations and individuals to be channeled through the Southern Convention Office and credited to the churches in a special column of The Annual. We recommend that this "Authorized Special" be a ceiling on special funds to be raised from the church constituency of the Convention for current operations.

We further recommend that the Convention authorize the Christian Orphanage to raise \$20,000 per year from non-Convention sources for building rehabilitation purposes.

- 7. The Mission Board. We recommend that in addition to an annual apportionment of \$12,500 for Convention Home Missions and Church Extension, the Convention authorize the Mission Board to raise during Mission Period an "Authorized Special" of \$25,000 annually for these purposes, such "Authorized Special" gifts to be channeled through the Southern Convention Office and credited to the churches in a special column of The Annual. We recommend that this "Authorized Special" be a ceiling on special funds to be raised from the church constituency of the Convention for current operation. We also recommend an "Authorized Special" of \$7,500 for Foreign Missions.
- 8. We recommend that all churches be urged to raise their Missions and Benevolent Funds by securing subscriptions for their entire Conference Apportionments. Churches which do not raise their entire apportionments by means of subscriptions should receive a special Offering for Missions at Easter, a special Thanksgiving Offering for the Orphanage, a special Christmas Offering for Ministerial Relief, and a special Offering for Elon College during the College Period. Until the regular contributions are sufficient to meet apportionments, churches should seek to raise the apportionments in full by seeking special gifts from individuals.
- 9. We recommend the continuance of the present plan of regular monthly offerings for Missions and the Orphanage, and the Fifth Sunday Offering for Elon College,

to be taken by the Sunday Schools, until the amount of the apportionment for each shall be raised in full, thereafter all benevolent contributions from Sunday Schools should be allotted to the other items of apportionments which have not been raised in full. Contributions from Sunday Schools should be forwarded through the designated channels and credited on the respective Conference Apportionments.

- 10. We recommend that the Orphanage, the Mission Board and Elon College be authorized to make appeals for contributions, each during the period herein designated, as follows: Elon College—January, February, September and October; Missions—March, April, May and June; Orphanage—November and December; that Communion offerings may be received for Ministerial Relief; and that at Christmas a special offering may be taken for the "Christmas Fund for the Veterans of the Cross," said offering to be forwarded to the Division of Ministerial Relief of the Board of Home Missions, New York, as an emergency fund and extra appropriation to the superannuates. It is recommended that the practice of making appeals to churches, Sunday Schools and auxiliaries for material or financial gifts at other times than during the periods designated, be discontinued.
- 11. We recommend that the Board of Christian Education be authorized to appeal for offerings on Children's Day from Sunday Schools, and from individuals during July and August.

We recommend that all funds contributed by churches, church organizations, or by individuals of churches of the Convention, be credited to their churches, be transmitted to the Convention Treasurer through the Convention Office; that the Convention Office report such gifts to the Secretary of the Conference in which the local church holds membership; and that each local church secretary be furnished with a report of all funds sent from his church for Convention enterprises, together with the balances due.

- 12. During the past biennium several churches have followed the practice of sending contributions to the Convention Office with the request that they be distributed proportionately to all apportionment items. We commend these churches in this practice and recommend it to all the churches of the Convention for their favorable consideration.
- 13. We have checked the report of the Treasurer against the audit of Owen & Hogan, C. P. A., and have found same to be correct.

The report of the Mission Board was read by Mrs. John G. Truitt, chairman. Pending its adoption, the following persons addressed the Convention on various phases of the board's work: Melvin Dollar, Everette Neese, R. L. Jackson. Mrs. W. E. Wisseman told of the board's relationship to the Home Board of the General Council, and Henry E. Robinson spoke concerning the relationship of the board to the Prudential Committee of the A. B. C. F. M. The report was adopted as follows:

MISSION BOARD REPORT.

Leaders in all walks of public life state that only a spiritual awakening can bring order and peace out of the struggle and chaos of our world. That men are seeking spiritual answers to their perplexities is evident in every land. Our churches should be meeting this challenge. We are not doing so only because of a lack of funds and personnel.

May we look at the work of our American Board in the foreign mission fields-

THE NEAR EAST.

In Greece, Syria, and Turkey, American personnel are still the key to our witness. We need salaries for permanent families and we need to find well-trained,

dynamic, devoted Christians for permanent service. We need also buildings, and continuing hope and renewed zeal.

THE MISSION OF FELLOWSHIP TO EUROPE.

This fellowship is a two-way bond between European and American churches. Mission of Fellowship to Europe will include all the projects in continental Europe of Congregational Christian agencies, American Board activities in Greece, the C.C.W.V.R. and C.C.S.C. relief and rehabilitation program in England, Germany and Italy, the joint American Board and Social Action undertakings in France and Greece, the ecumenically organized services to refugees and the ecumenically oriented work camps.

"More must be done in Europe than has been done" as the church bears witness. This is a real part of our Christian World Mission.

Transition in China.

In 1948 there were 91 American Board missionaries in China. Between June, 1949, and January, 1950, the missionaries left China, a few at a time, until now (November, 1951) there are only three missionaries left in China and they are together at Tungchow, thirteen miles from Peking.

Of these 88 who have left China, 35 per cent have been transferred to seven other fields, 35 per cent have withdrawn to other work and 30 per cent have been retired. A few of the young missionaries are being kept available for possible future return to China.

Since December 16, 1950, the American Board has sent no funds to China. Funds designated for China, are being set aside in a China Opportunity Fund, pending the day when friendly relations are again established between China and the United States. Missionary residences in most stations are now occupied by government officials. The schools and hospitals have in most cases become nationalized institutions aided by grants from the government. The Chinese church is going through the valley of the shadow of death, but we have been assured by the executives of the Church of Christ in China that the real Christians will remain true to their faith. The church will be there, somewhere, when the present storm has subsided. Pray for it and for the Christians, keeping alive your faith in them and loyalty to them.

PACIFIC AREA MISSION.

Japan.—Ten great Mission Boards in America together administer their program in Japan, working through the Council of Cooperation in Tokyo. By thus working unitedly, the contribution of each board in money and personnel doubles and trebles in effectiveness.

The International Christian University is the concern of all denominations. The American Board supports two faculty members and gives two annual scholarships of \$500.00 each for teachers in our schools to study at ICU.

Micronesia—The American Board, with 8 missionaries, is responsible for all the Protestant mission work being done in five island areas, separated by hundreds of sea miles from each other.

We need here 6 new missionary families and funds to purchase Morning Star VII.

The Philippines—The Presbyterian and American Boards pool their appropriations and work cooperatively. It is expected that the Evangelical United Brethren and Disciples will join this union before this year is over. Five new families are needed in the Philippines to replace serious losses during the year, to teach at the College of Theology and at Southern Christian College.

India and Ceylon—The purpose is evangelism—the chief means is the church. The key to a strong church is leadership. This means missionaries. Increasingly it means nationals. Out of 45 major enterprises in India and Ceylon, 27 now have an Indian bead. The Mission Board is grateful to the pastors and lay leaders of the Southern Convention who have caught the vision of the essential tasks of foreign missions.

Africa—The 1952 American Board budget provides for 14 couples and five single workers whose primary assignment is evangelistic work.

This year our foreign mission budget calls for \$9,240.00 for India; \$4,800.00 for Japan; \$1,200.00 for Philippine Islands; \$12,000.00 General Fund; \$500.00 new projects; \$1,200.00 Timothy Chang; \$3,160.00 Administration. Total—\$32,400.00.

May we take seriously our opportunity.

OUR HOME MISSION PROGRAM.

The need for church extension within our Convention is great. Growing communities everywhere need churches, additional building programs for established churches, and new churches in strategic places within our Convention. Within this biennium two new churches have been established in the Convention—Beverly Hills, Eurlington, North Carolina, and Eutaw at Fayetteville, North Carolina. Our 1952 budget included some funds for new work at Harrisonburg, Virginia, Franklinton, North Carolina, and Siler City, North Carolina. The Mission Board feels it must make contributions to the following churches this year: Asheborc, Burlington—Beverly Hills, Burlington—Lakeview, Carroll County—Rocky Ford, Ebenezer, Fayetteville, Greensboro First, Greensboro Palm Street, Harrisonburg, Lee's Chapel, Liberty, Norfolk—Bay View, Norfolk—Second, Southern Pines, Asheville, Bailey's Grove, Big Oak, Belew Creek, Salem Chapel, Chapel Hill, Elon College, High Point, Kallam Grove, Mt. Bethel, New Lebanon, Mebane, Zion, Newport News, Siler City, Valley Conference and Winston-Salem.

Our Home Mission budget calls for \$43,448.00 for Building Aid and Salary Aid, \$3,860.00 for administration, \$2,000.00 for our National Home Mission Board, making a total Home Mission budget of \$49,308.00.

Grand total Home and Foreign Missions-\$81,708.00.

In addition to this, we are being requested by the National Home Board to join in what they call "Our Number One Home Missionary Opportunity." That of matching the incredible expansive thrust of our nation with an equally dynamic outreach and evangelistic dedication on the part of the Christian fellowship. The rapidity of expansion of our population has confounded the experts and forced a rethinking of America's future. Some of this increased population can be served by existing churches, much of it, however, is concentrated in newly developed areas and in brand new communities where there are no churches at all. Allowing a minimum rate of one church to every 5,000 of new population, Protestantism faces the task of providing 6,600 new churches during the next decade The Congregational Christian fellowship represents one-thirtieth of the Protestant strength of our country. Our share is thus 220 new churches.

We must share in this nation-wide church extension program. Those of us who heard Dr. Truman B. Douglass on his recent visit to our Convention, felt committed to a share in this national undertaking.

That the church may bear witness—my friends of the Southern Convention, we must share more of our dollars. May we do just that during this biennium.

Salary Aid—\$21,928.70: Belew Creek-Salem Chapel, Biscoe, Burlington—"Beverly Hills," Carroll County (Elk Spur-Rocky Ford), Chapel Hill, Elon College Community, High Point, Lynchburg, Mebane, Pleasant Ridge-Spoon's Chapel-Union Grove, Seagrove-Shady Grove-Ether, Siler City, Sophia-Bailey's Grove, Union (So.), Norfolk—"Bay View," Virginia Valley—Pastorates Nos. 1, 2, 3, 5; Winston-Salem, Zion, Fayette-ville—"Eutaw Community," Asheville—"First."

Special Aid—\$2,325.43: Richmond, Western N. C. Conference, Asheboro, Portsmouth—"Elm Avenue," Fayetteville—"Eutaw Community," Burlington—"Beverly Hills."

Building Aid—\$46,564.05: Burlington—"Brookwood" (lot); Zion (N. C.-Va.); Carroll County (Elk Spur parsonage); Burlington—"Beverly Hills" (parsonage and parish house); Franklinton (parsonage); Hank's Chapel (parsonage); Concord (N. C.-Va.); Greensboro—"First" and "Palm Street"; Norfolk—"Second"; Sanford; Windsor; Union (So.); Liberty (W. N. C.—parsonage); Asheboro (lot); Gibsonville; Southern Pines.

For the same period, the Board forwarded to The American Board and to Relief and Reconstruction, Boston, Massachusetts, the sum of \$53,860.04 for the world mission of the church. The amount of \$3,892.55 was forwarded to the Board of Home Missions for missions in the U. S. A. and Puerto Rico (does not include other receipts to BHM for the Division of Ministerial Relief from the Board of Superannuation).

During the biennium, five Christian nationals have blessed us with their presence while studying in our country. Of these—Silas Chang, Shaowu, China, Masuo Takanaka of Japan, and Prakash S. Bhonsle of India, were brought to America with funds from the Cora Anthony Trust Fund and First Church, Greensboro. Timothy Chang of Shaowu, China, is being supported during his training here by the Life Membership and Memorial funds of the Woman's Missionary Convention. Jose Dabuet of the Philippines, is being supported by the Youth Fellowship of the Convention.

Special tribute is due our Reidsville Church in its continued support of three missionaries in addition to the regular foreign mission giving. Their missionaries are Rev. and Mrs. R. C. H. Mueller of India, and Miss Harriet Summerville of West Africa.

Two new churches have been organized during the biennium. Burlington, "Beverly Hills," and Fayetteville, "Eutaw Community." The Beverly Hills church was made possible largely through the generosity of Mr. D. R. Fonville, the late Miss Sadie V. Fonville, and Burlington, "First Church." A parsonage and parish house have been completed on a spacious lot, and the work is growing. In Fayetteville, Mrs. Florence L. Rogers generously donated a spacious building site in the heart of a new residential section of that growing city, and under the leadership of Rev. Kenneth M. Lindner, a promising work has been begun.

The Second Church, Norfolk, Virginia, under the leadership of Rev. J. Everette Neese, has relocated in a large new residential community of approximately 1,800 homes. A new building has been completed and the work is growing.

A building site in the Brookwood section of Burlington has been purchased through the cooperation of the N. C.-Va. Conference Missionary Association for future development of a new church there.

Mr. C. R. Faucette of our First Church, Burlington, has donated a spacious lot in the Lakeview community near Burlington, where a new church will be organized in the near future.

Commendation is due the Christian Temple, Norfolk, for generous contributions to Bay View and Second Churches toward their building program. The Christian Temple, along with Burlington, "First Church," point the way that other of our established churches might well take in aiding new and promising fields in need of assistance.

The Board aided and takes pride in the growth of Union (So.), near Franklin, Virginia, and their new plant completed during the past year; in the erection of Zion's first unit; in Concord's (N. C.-Va.) new edifice; Greensboro, "First" and "Palm Street"; Sanford; Gibsonville and Windsor. Hank's Chapel and Liberty Churches have completed new parsonages, and the Elk Spur parsonage has been modernized with the help of the Board.

Our churches in the Virgima Valley Central Conference, aided by the Board on salary of pastors for several years, have made commendable progress toward self-support. The same is true of our Winston-Salem and Asheboro churches. Bailey's Grove, located on the northern edge of Asheboro and in the midst of a growing community, takes on great promise. Several other points aided by the Board have come to self-support. It is the aim of the Board to help the churches to come to a full-time, self-supporting program as rapidly as possible.

The members of the Board are troubled that limited funds prevented undertaking other new work and the development of several promising fields. The rapid growth and great shift of population in our area and throughout our nation demand that we do a better job of church extension. We earnestly hope that additional funds may be available to do a job in keeping with our faith in the Living Christ and His Church.

We should prove ourselves ungrateful to our denomination if we failed to give acknowledgment to the Church Building Department of our Board of Home Missions of New York, and its Secretary—William Kincaid Newman—and to Curtis Schumacher, financial advisor. They have given assistance both materially and spiritually. Our Church Building Department faces the need of additional capital funds for the purpose of aiding our churches throughout the nation in building programs. It is possible that a campaign for such funds will be authorized at the approaching session of the General Council. It is hoped that if such an effort is undertaken, our churches of the Convention will give their generous support. The City Work Department of the Board of Home Missions is also sharing with our Board in aid to our church at Asheville and the new work at Fayetteville.

The need for the effective presentation of the Gospel in our homeland may be multiplied many times as we look at our tragic world—sin-sick, afraid, hungry, ill, in body and soul. The Church has brought hope and healing in the past, and her Christ is still the only hope of the world. Our witness unto all the world through our 400 American missionaries and 8,000 native Christian workers can be multiplied by the increased gifts we are able to make.

No longer is it "Home" or "Foreign" Missions that should claim our concern, prayers, our sons and daughters, and our material gifts. It is in "one world" that we live. We shall as a local community, nation and world either live together in Jesus Christ, or we shall surely die together in our denial of him. He is our peace, our hope, and not ours alone but of the whole wide earth. May the churches of the Southern Convention not fail to bear the witness with power!

WM. T. Scott, Executive Secretary. Dr. Vere V. Loper addressed the Convention on the theme: "Where the Light Breaks Through."

The Convention adjourned for lunch at 1:00 o'clock. The benediction was given by Rev. R. A. Whitten.

WEDNESDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

President Stevens called the Convention to order at 2:00 p.m. Rev. Silas E. Madren led in prayer.

Dr. W. E. Wisseman, reporting for the Business Committee, made the following recommendations which were adopted:

- 1. That we hear the Report of Elon College following the address of Dr. Robert Lee House.
- 2. That time be given this afternoon to hear a report on the Christian Rural Overseas Program.
- 3. That we recommend the scope of the O'Kelly Memorial Foundation be enlarged to cover the Historical Room at Elon College and Old Lebanon Church in Virginia and that the matter be referred to the Executive Board for implementation.
 - 4. That we approve the recommendations of the Superintendent's Report.
- 5. That the following motion as presented by Dr. A. D. Stauffacher, Minister and Executive Secretary of the Missions Council be approved:

That The Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, Inc., assembled in its Biennial Session, April 29-May 1, 1952, approve the proposal to raise a substantial addition to the Church Building Loan Funds in terms of the proposed recommendation to the General Council at Claremont and authorizes its Executive Board to implement this vote of this Convention in whatever ways it may deem wise and necessary to assure the success of the undertaking.

6. That time be given on Thursday morning, following report of Superintendent's home, for a report on Moonelon.

Dr. Robert Lee House, editor of The Christian Sun, addressed the Convention.

The report on Elon College was presented by President L. E. Smith and, pending its adoption, Dr. Wm. T. Scott spoke on "Apportionments for the College" and Rev. W. Millard Stevens spoke on "The Sustaining Fund." It was moved to adopt the resolutions contained in the report. A motion to amend the report by deleting item No. 3 relating to the discontinuance of free tuition scholarships to full-time Christian workers other than ministerial students was presented and, on the question being put, was carried. A motion to adopt the report as amended was voted.

ELON COLLEGE BIENNIAL REPORT.

In directing our attention to the necessity of Christian education in a changing age it is well that we remind ourselves of certain historical facts and evident trends in the field of higher education today. Seventy-five to one hundred years ago a dual system of education obtained in European countries as it obtains in our country at present. What we mean by a dual system of education is our land grant or tax-supported institutions and our privately endowed or church-related colleges. In Europe as the state multiplied its support it naturally increased its authority over the state supported colleges. This continued through the years until eventually practically all of the privately endowed or church-related colleges disappeared from the scene. Germany and Russia are conspicuous examples. These conditions created a Hitler, a Stalin and others.

Fifty or seventy-five years ago in America all leading denominations had their academies or institutes to which children of high school age were sent for training. At that time, if not before, these denominations also started their colleges and opened their doors for the training of the young people of the homes of their churches and other young people, guaranteeing to them opportunities in the field of higher education under moral and religious influences. The state with tax money, began to build a system of secondary education for all young people of high school age. The public school system has grown, the academies and institutes have disappeared, and the state holds undisputed pre-eminence in the field of secondary education up to the college level. Our dual system of education in America is in the twilight of the eclipse that descended upon higher education in Europe a half century and more ago. The state and the federal governments are constantly and decisively increasing their appropriation for the support of higher education in this country and resultantly and eventually will increase its authority over the entire curriculum of higher education in our country.

Beyond question the privately endowed college has made a significant contribution to the development of our resources, human and material. They have been the sustaining source of American democracy. They have contributed significantly to the American way of life and to freedom in every field of human endeavor. It would be a dark and dismal day should the force and contribution of these institutions pass from the field of higher education and the total training of our young people fall into the hands of the state to become dominated by unscrupulous politicians.

The time has come, the day is here, when the church with its resources, and in its passion for the truth and spiritual might, must dedicate itself to the cause of Christian higher education anew, and serve notice that with its resources and by the Grace of God it will assure to the present generation of young people, and the generations yet to come, the preservation of the type of education that has made its contributions, not only to the cause of education, but to the Cause of Christ as well, and made for freedom in all walks of life. The church must show these young people that these schools shall not pass from the field of higher education but shall endure to serve for all time.

These are facts and trends that we of the Southern Convention must face and should consider in all seriousness. Sixty-three years ago, with a love for their church, with a passion for the coming of the Kingdom of God, and with a determination to provide proper facilities for the training of the youth of our church and others, they arose, and out of their comparative poverty, put their meager offerings on the altar and built for our church in that far away day an institution of higher learning. We are confronted today with the questions, do we realize what they did? Have we considered what these acts of devotion and sacrifice have meant to our church, its growth, its development, its future? Are we, in our comparative financial ease, in comparison to their comparative poverty willing and ready to give out of our abundance that the institution founded in faith and poverty may be given its needed financial and spiritual support, that it may embark anew on the high mission that was determined for it by its founders?

It is imperative that the denominations in our country sponsoring church-related colleges increase their economic support of these colleges. We of the Southern Convention cannot begin to estimate the total contribution of Elon College to our church,

its institutions, boards, and departments. Increased interest and increased financial support are mandatory that the college may continue its services so necessary to the life and progress of our denomination.

During these more than sixty years Elon College has had its financial difficulties as well as its material successes. Through want and plenty it has persevered and today it takes its place in the forefront in the field of Christian higher education together with other small privately endowed colleges in this country.

- I. Student Enrollment—Elon College is supported largely by student tuition and fees. An enrollment of 700 college students is required to provide funds for the present budget of the college. When the enrollment drops, there is a corresponding drop in college funds The total expense of a boarding student is \$720; for a non-resident student \$295. The present enrollment for the year is about 600. Operating expenses are about the same for 600 students as for 700. These facts present the college with a serious financial problem.
- II. Instructors—There are forty men and women employed as instructors in Elon College. These are all qualified to instruct from the standpoint of training, experience, and church affiliation. There are 10 with Ph.D. degrees, 26 with M. A. degrees, and four with A. B. degrees. Seven have completed resident requirements for Ph.D. degrees. Salaries range from \$2,400 for instructors to \$4,700 for full professors for nine months' service for an average of \$3,480. This represents a part of the college monthly payroll that must be met at the first of each month.
- III. Buildings and Improvement—During the past biennium the college has erected no new buildings. It has been compelled to make considerable repairs. The steam and water lines that have been underground for years have begun to give way. This has proven a tedious, difficult, and expensive repair job. Whitley auditorium has been completely renovated and redecorated. The auditorium, which was by far the greatest part of the cost, was paid for by the Woman's Missionary Thank Offering at a cost of \$3,666.66. The college and the church are indebted to the ladies of the Convention for the job well done.
- IV. Finance—1. Budget—From 1932 to 1935 the operating budget was \$86,000. This did not include groceries for the dining room but it did include faculty salaries, campus labor, heat and electric bills. We found it impossible to meet this budget. Beginning with 1935 the budget began to increase. The student body increased. From 1935 to the present date the college has operated on a balance budget. We shall doubtless be able to meet ordinary demands until June 1. Since the college pays faculty salaries on a twelve-month basis, twenty-five per cent of these salaries for 1951-52 will be due. At present there is no possible means of meeting these financial obligations during the summer months unless the church, through the Sustaining Fund and Conference Apportionments will give assistance. If, through these two funds or other sources, \$50,000 could be raised in full by September 1, we would have a chance of meeting these financial demands. I am sure that if the church fully realized the actual condition of the college and possible consequences that every individual and every church would make special efforts to do its part.
- 2. Endowment—By strenuous and scrupulous efforts the endowment funds of the college that had been pledged to creditors on college obligations were salvaged. A total of \$231,000 represented the total assets of the endowment funds in 1931-32. In 1942 the college debts were all paid and these funds returned to the college. Actions were taken to guarantee that these funds, or any other permanent funds of the college, would never again be pledged as collateral for loans. Today endowment funds total \$472,000 book value. Actual value would exceed \$500,000.
- 3. Invested Funds—Out of the current funds of the college and from other sources the college has more than \$300,000 in invested funds, faculty houses, veterans' apartments, building and loan stocks and industrial stocks. From these particular investments the college receives an annual income of more than \$25,000.
- 4. Debt—In 1947 the General Alumni Association of the College undertook to build a gymnasium and to raise funds to pay for same. The association ran into financial difficulties. The college assumed the balance due. In 1949 the college paid \$20,000 out of its current funds on the gymnasium debt. A balance of \$68,000 is due on the gymnasium as of this date.

- V. Needs—Anyone familiar with Elon College is aware of its various and varied needs. To list these needs would be difficult. Yet there are specific needs on the campus that are discernible even by a casual visitor.
- 1. Dining Room—In 1942 the college dining room, together with every article of equipment, was completely destroyed by fire. A temporary kitchen was built on the east side of the Mooney Christian Education Building. The YMCA and YWCA social halls were used as dining rooms. During the distribution of war surplus properties, Elon College was fortunate to secure from the government a dining room and cafeteria equipment. These have been quite acceptable as temporary equipment only. During the fall of 1951 the kitchen, with all of its equipment, was again destroyed by fire. The dining room was damaged but not extensively. The kitchen has been replaced with another temporary building and furnished with permanent equipment. This was completely covered by insurance. At present we are feeding our students in temporary quarters. A self-respecting institution, as our college is, must be provided with adequate facilities for such vital and essential service.
- 2. For years and years we have been talking about new dormitories, emphasizing this need and appealing to the church, alumni, and friends for funds with which to provide these facilities. We need very badly a minimum of one new dormitory for girls and one for boys.
- 3. Funds for current expenses—The Convention has authorized that \$15,000 be allocated to the college as a part of the conference apportionment for the support of the college. Not in the history of the institution, I believe, has the full amount been raised and turned over to the college. Steps should be taken to keep this action of the Convention before our conferences and churches. At the last session of this Convention a provision was passed for additional support for the college by the churches, to be known as the Elon College Sustaining Fund. In this action the Convention called on all of our churches to undertake to raise a minimum of \$1 per member annually for the ensuing biennium. This effort was not entirely successful but the funds raised meant a great deal to the college and kept it out of the red for 1951-52. The total amount raised was \$12,057.87.
- 4. Scholarship Funds—Years ago all the conferences of the Convention, with the exception of the Eastern Virginia Conference, pooled their Ministerial Funds and put them in the hands of the Treasurer of the college to be administered by a committee to ministerial students needing financial assistance other than free tuition scholarship given by the college. This loan fund has served a good purpose but repayment of loans has been poor. On May 1, 1946, the Southern Convention, in biennial session at Waverly, Virginia, authorized the college to grant free tuition scholarships to all full-time Christian workers. During those years considerable money has been contributed to such students. This doubtlessly has meant much to individual students, but full-time Christian workers after graduation from college have not materialized.

In addition to scholarships for ministerial students there are a number of other students who are clamoring for assistance and must have additional financial assistance if they are to continue in college. Many other colleges have large scholarship funds to aid such students. There is a growing demand for such funds at Elon College. We have some friends who are interested in establishing such funds, the income from which to be given or loaned to worthy students. We should encourage contributions for a fund of this kind.

- 5. Grants—On May 1, 1946, the Southern Convention at Waverly, Virginia, authorized the establishment of a fund for grants to ministerial students. The Convention should clarify its position as to what type of students should receive grants from this fund; whether for those preparing to be pastors, missionaries, or teachers, and should anyone receive this grant and fail to perform the function pledged when the grants were made, repay such funds. Are these funds to be granted to students for undergraduate studies, seminary or university students, or any or all?
- 6. The Two-Million Dollar Campaign Fund—In 1946 the Southern Convention at the request of the Trustees of Elon College, authorized the college to launch a campaign to raise one million dollars for buildings, improvements, and endowment. In 1948 it was evident that the one million dollars would not be sufficient to meet the needs of the college, and again at the request of the college the Convention authorized

the college to increase the goal of the Convention to Two Million Dollars, this amount to be secured for the college over a period of ten years, beginning in 1946.

We have now passed the half-way mark in time. We have also passed the half-way mark in funds. Up to the time we began to intensify the campaign with the hope of completing this effort a total of \$996,000 had been received in cash and pledges; since then we have secured in cash and pledges a total of \$181,300, making a grand total of \$1,177,300 in cash and pledges to date. I should say that \$50,000 of this amount, \$24,000 of which is in cash, is being held at the request of the donors with the hope that additions may be made to this amount for a new dining room.

Now it is evident that two million dollars will not be sufficient for the barest needs of the college. The Board of Trustees of the college is requesting the Convention in this session to authorize an additional \$250,000, making the total goal of \$2,250,000. The campaign is to be completed and money paid by January 31, 1956.

This is a big undertaking for our people, but we are able and if we have the courage to put first things first we shall succeed. Some can give more generously than others, but all who earn can and should contribute something. We shall need gifts in the following amounts:

The above would make a total, in pledges, amounting to \$1,295,000.00.

The minimum contribution for alumni and members of the church should be \$1 per month for five years. Most any wage earner can contribute this amount. We are in the process of forming a nation-wide organization by which every individual church member, alumnus and friend of Elon College shall be approached and given an opportunity to contribute to this worthy and appealing cause.

RESOLUTIONS.

- 1. That this Convention, through its office and Superintendent, direct that more emphasis be given to the needs of the college and the necessity of each church raising its full apportionment for the college.
- 2. That the Convention continue the Sustaining Fund for the support of the college and that in the interest of economy a sustaining fund committee be set up in each conference for the implementation of this action of the convention.
- 3. That the Convention authorize and direct the college administration to give publicity to the need of a general scholarship fund, encourage, and solicit contributions for this cause for Elon College. All contributions to this fund to be a part of the permanent funds of the college; only the income to be for loans or grants to students in Elon College.
- 4. That the Convention authorize the college to increase the goal of its present campaign by \$250,000, making a total goal of \$2,250,000 and that we call upon every member of our church to make a personal and liberal contribution to our college.

The report of the Board of Superannuation was presented with the suggestion that it be voted on Thursday morning.

The report on the Christian Orphanage was presented by Dr. John G. Truitt, superintendent, and it was voted to receive the report and make it a part of the minutes.

REPORT OF THE ORPHANAGE,

During the biennium the Orphanage has cared for 104 children. In 1950, ten were sent to private homes, and in 1951, thirteen were sent to private homes. We closed the biennium with 80. Of these, four are less than six years old, 45 less than 12; and 31 are over 12 years of age. During 1951, 92 were cared for. There were 40 boys and girls at the close of 1951. Of these 25 were from broken homes, 15 mother dead, 39 father dead, and one both father and mother dead.

We prepared and served 177,982 meals during the biennium. Within the two years 90 children were confined to their bed for one day or more on account of sickness. This is considered a good record, as only two or three children have had serious illnesses. The children are served good food, for instance, they consumed during the biennium 57,200 quarts of whole A-grade milk furnished by the Orphanage dairy, and

more than 5,000 dozens of eggs from the Orphanage poultry yard.

Making a home for 80 boys and girls means more than clothes and shoes for 80 children; means more than loads of laundry each week; means more than beds and rooms, and bathrooms, playrooms and study halls and furniture; means more than three meals every day and a place where they may be prepared and served. More than all this, it means that the lives and destinies of 80 children are being fashioned; their school being done; their faith in themselves, in God, and fellowman is being built; security and love and guidance are being given. It also means that the membership and friends of nearly 200 churches have been given the joy of doing something for a little homeless boy or girl.

Considerable business goes into making, furnishing, and maintaining such a home. A farm is operated, including a dairy, a sizable swine herd, a small beginning beef herd, a poultry yard, grain, hay, corn fields, gardens, and pastures. This takes management, and labor, and good business. With the high wage scale, it takes improved machinery, and the maintenance of the same. From the farm feed for around 55 head of cattle and cows, around a hundred hogs and pigs, and 250 hens were purchased, also much of the food for the Orphanage family—corn, beans, potatoes, sweet potatoes, tomatoes, etc. Tabulation of all such food, and feed consumed, plus milk, pork, and grain sold, the farm last year—counting everything sold and consumed at current market value—reached a total of \$33,454.02.

Public relations, administration, and general supervision amounts to considerable. Receiving, acknowledging and accounting for all funds requires careful attention. Letters of appreciation are sent to all contributors. There is purchasing of supplies, and paying for same; investigating applications, doing case-work and social service on scores of cases; filling vacancies on the staff of matrons; receiving children into the Orphanage family; answering and deciding on unnumbered questions posed by children and staff workers; and seeking to keep everybody happy and the house in order everywhere amounts to considerable. But it is a job with its rewards and joys, and happy is the man who sees the good cooperation and help of many, many friends. Your help shows you have hearts and minds of understanding, and that you desire to care for the orphan children whose hands are stretched out to you.

During the biennium a superintendent's home has been built at a cost of \$22,000, much of which was provided by the Orphanage forest, and some by reduced prices on material purchased. A total of \$10,000 was provided by a loan; the remainder by friends with special donations designated particularly for the purpose. None of it

came from the regular funds and gifts of the Orphanage.

During the biennium fire escapes have been installed on the Baby Home; a new roof has been installed on the Johnston Hall; the rooms on the first floor of the Main Building, and some on the second floor have been repaired and redecorated; the milk house has been rebuilt; a large machinery shed has been built; a new tractor, a new truck, and a new hay baler have been bought; a new water tank has been installed; new pastures have been prepared and sown in ladino clover and fescue grass, and fences have been repaired and built.

During the biennium we collected in 1950 from farm, churches and friends \$60, 506.27. During the year 1951 we received from farm, churches and friends \$74,863.58. These figures include amounts received on the superintendent's home. Total for the biennium was \$135,369.85. This includes the sale of milk, grain—oats, wheat and corn—hogs and cows. In the year 1951 although the drought shortened our milk production and our grain yield, we sold, included in the above 1951 figure, enough to

amount to \$8,817.02.

I wish to express my appreciation for your help, your kindness and your cooperation; also thanks to many friends beyond our Convention and membership who have helped; and finally thanks to the faithfuless and cooperation of our splendid staff of helpers. We pledge our best to you and to every child received into your Orphanage.

Rev. Carl R. Key, regional supervisor of CROP (the Christian Rural Overseas Program), was presented and told of the work of this organization.

The Convention adjourned at 5:00 p.m., with the benediction by Rev. Johnson Griffin.

WEDNESDAY—EVENING SESSION.

The Wednesday evening session was called to order by the president at 7:30. Dr. L. E. Smith presented the Elon College Singers under the direction of John Westmoreland, with Miss Laverne Brady as accompanist.

Professor F. E. Reynolds of Elon College conducted the worship service and introduced Dr. Russell Henry Stafford, president of Hartford Seminary Foundation, who delivered an eloquent address on "Tomorrow's Leaders."

An offering of \$58.13 for the expenses of the Elon Singers was received. The Convention adjourned with the benediction by Dr. Reynolds.

THURSDAY—MORNING SESSION.

President Stevens called the Thursday morning session of the Convention to order at 9:15. Rev. W. W. Snyder conducted the devotional service.

The report of the Historian was made by Dr. C. E. Newman and, on motion, was received and made a part of the record, with the understanding that any additional data which might be received later should also be recorded.

REPORT OF HISTORIAN.

Circumstances have prevented plans being carried out to type certain historical data available to put in book form for our Church History room in the Elon Library. I hope that at sometime this will be completed.

At the 1950 session of this body, there was given a brief history of this Convention beginning in 1847 under the name of The Southern Christian Association, which in 1856 was changed to the General Convention of the Christian Church, South, and for the past sixty years we have carried on under the name of the Southern Christian Convention, and now the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, Inc.

At the close of the 19th century, fifty-three years after organization, in the face of disaster and discouragement, we were making progress. Our membership had increased three-fold. We numbered 10,000; our property value was \$200,000. There was a growing interest in all our church enterprises. Our first foreign missionaries were at work in Japan. We owned and operated our own institution of higher learning. Our churches were being organized for more progressive work. At the dawn of the present century the work of the minister often extended over a vast area. Scarcely anything had been done to provide a home for the minister. In 1950, the 195 churches in North Carolina and Virginia were united into 97 pastoral units. There were 70 parsonages, and the greater number of these built in the two previous decades. The value of our church property was \$4,300,000. Of this, \$800,000 was in our parsonages. Adding to this the Orphanage and College property, it was six and one-half million. The average salary of the full-time minister is \$2,500 and a home. The year 1949 was a banner year in material improvements. One hundred and sixteen churches spent \$264,483 in improvements. We have eighty parsonages. The value of church property apart from the institutions of the Southern Convention is over six and a quarter million. Gain in 1951 over 1950 is nearly one million.

During the past two years we have received into our Convention three new churches. Rev. Thurman F. Bowers joined the North Carolina and Virginia Conference and recently brought with him his church, Calvary Christian of Greensboro, North Carolina, with one hundred and seventy-five members and property valued at \$35,000. There are two hundred in the Sunday School. Two new churches were organized—Burlington, "Beverly Hills' and Fayetteville, "Eutaw Community." Several points are being considered for new church organizations.

One in a position to know the future prospects in the work of our Convention speaks most hopefully concerning the new earnestness and zeal on the part of pastors and members to emphasize evangelism and stewardship. Our churches in all phases of the work are being more thoroughly organized. The Woman's Convention has for several decades given a growing interest in the mission spirit of our church. The Youth Fellowship continues of greater value in the spiritual life and the training for service our young people. The Laymen's Fellowship as it grows in numbers and influence is opening up new vistas of service in the entire church.

The gift of Moonelon, near Elon College, for a Convention Center by Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Sellers, Burlington, N. C., will prove valuable in the work of our young people's conferences, especially. The gift constitutes twenty acres of land, a swimming pool, two buildings, a lake and other facilities.

With our increase in churches and membership, our growing wealth and increasing intelligence, together with the hundreds of young people trained as never before for good citizenship and for efficient service in the church, we can move on in confidence that the golden age of work of the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches lies ahead of us.

The report of the Church History Room at Elon College was received with thanks to Mrs. Oma U. Johnson and made a part of the record.

CHURCH HISTORY ROOM AT ELON COLLEGE.

About twenty years ago the librarian of Elon College was faced with the realization that the College Library had a few items that were very valuable as Church History material. She realized more keenly that a great deal more material, even more valuable, could and should be assembled and preserved for all time.

Some effort was put forth to collect this material. Whereupon it was felt that it was very necessary that this material be stored in a safe place where it could be made available for use, but under strict supervision.

During the next fifteen years considerable amount of material was collected and placed in this room, and very roughly classified. Realizing this project could not be satisfactorily continued without giving it more time than could be spared from the regular work of the College Library, and not feeling justified in requesting this valuable material unless it could be properly cared for, the librarian discontinued her efforts to collect it, but gladly received such items as were sent to the library.

The matter of our Church History Room has been discussed at several meetings of the Convention and Conferences and also by many individuals. Everyone agrees that it is a very worthwhile project, and everyone would probably agree that it has been delayed too long already. Much of the most valuable material is being lost or destroyed every year—material that can never be replaced.

To mention only a few of the items in the room:

 - d. A short sketch of the Christians in Georgia and Alabama.
 - e. An outline of the Southern Christian Association.
 - f. A copy of the minutes of the Southern Christian Convention, 1856-1870.
 - g. A brief sketch of Education among the Christians in the South.
 - h. A copy of the early records of Holy Neck Christian Church in Virginia.
 - i. A copy of the deed for the land upon which Old Lebanon Christian Church stood.
- 3. Personal Journal of Elder Christy Sine written in his own handwriting.
- 4. Almost complete file of the CHRISTIAN ANNUAL.
- 5. Bulletin of Graham Institute, 1859.
- 6. Bulletin of Graham High School, 1873.
- 7. Several cases of records from Dr. Atkinson's office.
- 8. Bibles and Song Books used in several Old Churches.
- 9. Some writings of James O'Kelly.

The Church History Room, although a prized part of the College Library, should be a great strength and a prized possession of the entire denomination, and especially of the Southern Convention. To become what it should and could, it will be necessary for the Convention to lend its sponsorship and aid.

Immediate Needs—Filing cabinets, book cases and display cases for storage; lesser items such as folders, envelopes, mending material, catalog material, etc.; a part-time custodian, who should be a person who is both vitally interested and familiar with the church and Convention. The duties of this person would be to acquire a copy of all publications of the denomination, of the programs of all important church meetings, all printed books and pamphlets about church leaders, watch the newspapers for church items of permanent value, classify and file all material, and prepare a catalog of it.

In its present condition, the material in the Church History Room is not adequately preserved, and in almost no order.

It was voted to receive for the Church History Room a bell from the Graham Collegiate Institute offered by Rev. Emory M. Carter, and a photographic cut of Suffolk Collegiate Institute offered by Mr. John T. Kernodle.

The report of the Committee on Memoirs was presented by Dr. N. G. Newman and, on motion, it was received and made a part of the record.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS.

Rev. Samuel M. Johnson, a member of the N. C. and Va. Conference died February 4, 1951, aged 82 years. He had been retired for many years.

Rev. Ben Joe Earp of the Western North Carolina Conference was a native of Caswell County, N. C. He was a graduate of Elon College, and spent forty years in the Christian ministry. He served a number of churches in different conferences and did much hard work and fruitful service. His private life was marked by humility and sincerity; his ministry by earnest consecration, loyalty, and faithfulness. He died February 12, 1951, aged 63 years.

Rev. Herbert Scholz was of German descent. He was born in England and came to America when nine years of age. Later he became the foster son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Winborne of Wake County, N. C., by whom he was loved, reared, educated, and remembered in their will. He was one of the first three graduates of Elon College in 1891. He was a brilliant student, genial friend, and an exemplary character. Soon after graduation he entered the ministry and served a number of churches in the Eastern North Carolina Conference. He was at one time pastor of the First Church, Norfolk, Virginia, where he did some excellent work. It was during this period he organized and fostered the South Norfolk Church, now one of the largest and best in the Eastern Virginia Conference. He died at Macon, N. C., in 1950 at the age of 83 years.

Rev. William Parkyn Jackson was a native of Canada and the son of a Congregational minister. He was educated in Canadian institutions and entered the ministry of the Congregational denomination in 1905. He served several churches in the North and came to North Carolina in 1938. He was pastor of the Asheville Church from 1940 to 1945. His chief interest and greatest service was in welfare work with the young. He died in Asheville, N. C., June 16, 1950, aged 77 years.

Rev. Jesse E. Franks of the Eastern North Carolina Conference was of ministerial descent. His grandfather and great grandfather were both ministers of the gospel. He was ordained in 1915 and spent 20 years in active and zealous labor in his conference, serving at one time nine churches. He was forced into retirement by the loss of voice and much of his time in the latter days were given to business. He retained his interest in the church and kingdom and rendered valuable service. The magnificent church plant at Catawba Springs, erected after the fire of 1946, is largely a monument to his energy and zeal. His private life was one of sincerity, integrity, and honor. His ministerial life was characterized by consercation, zeal, and fidelity. He died May 27, 1951, aged 82 years.

Rev. William Stanley Carne, a native of England, came to America about 40 years ago. He served churches in Spokane, Seattle, and Leavenworth, Washington; Gorman, Maine; Northfield, Mass.; and Elizabethtown, N. Y. He united with the Eastern Virginia Conference in 1947, and served the First Church, Portsmouth, Virginia, till his death. He was a good preacher and faithful pastor. His affable nature readily won friends and his dignified bearing and fine spirit reflected credit on the ministry. He died in Portsmouth, Virginia, April 1, 1952, aged 67 years.

Dr. Luther B. Grice came into our fellowship from the Baptists where he had served important churches in Chicago, Florida, and North Carolina. He freely expressed himself as happy in his new formed fellowship and manifested a genuine interest in the enterprises of the denomination. He united with the Eastern Virginia Conference in 1948 and served Holy Neck and Eure's Churches until his death in 1950. He was a good preacher, faithful pastor, and genial friend. He was a dignified Christian gentleman and was a credit to his calling.

Rev. Joseph Frank Morgan was a native of Moore County, North Carolina, and graduate of Elon College. He was ordained in the Western North Carolina Conference in 1911 and served churches in North Carolina for five years. He came to the Eastern Virginia Conference in 1916 and served the First Church, Norfolk, for six years. He also served in Winchester, Rosemont, the Second Church, Norfolk, and the Windsor,

Virginia, charge. In all of these he did excellent work. The humility and sincerity of his private life and his consecration, devotion, loyalty, and faithful service as a minister, made him a great spiritual power and one of the best loved ministers in his conference. He died at his home in Norfolk, Virginia, in 1951, after two and one-half years of great affliction and suffering.

The Convention stood in silent reverence after which a prayer was offered by Rev. W. Millard Stevens.

Upon motion of Dr. W. E. Wisseman, chairman of the Business Committee, the Convention voted to reconsider its action on Wednesday morning with regard to the report of the Revisions Committee. Motion was then made, seconded and voted to adopt as a whole the report and recommendations of the Revisions Committee.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHANGES IN CONVENTION GOVERNMENT.

The following are the recommended changes in the Government of the Congregational Christian Churches of the Southern Convention. They have been printed in *The Christian Sun* in accordance with the provisions of the rules of the Convention:

CHAPTER I.—CHURCHES AND MEMBERS.

SECTION I.

Congregational Christian Churches.

The first paragraph now reads:

In the union of the Congregational Christian Churches it is provided that each local church shall have the right to determine whether it shall use the name Congregational or Christian, or Congregational Christian to indicate its denominational status; and it is understood that the adherence to the name used shall, in no case, be construed as a lack of loyalty to the United Churches.

Changed to read:

In the merger of the Congregational and Christian Churches it is provided that each local church shall have the right to determine whether it shall use the name Congregational or Christian, or Congregational Christian to indicate its denominational status; and it is understood that the adherence to the name used shall, in no case be construed as a lack of loyalty to the denomination.

Section II. Organization of Churches.

First paragraph now reads:

Those wishing to organize a new church within the bounds of the Southern Convention may use the form of organization set forth in the "Manual of Congregational and Christian Churches," by Dr. Charles Emerson Burton (1936 edition, pages 73-76), or the following:

Suggested change:

Those wishing to organize a new church within the bounds of the Southern Convention may use the form of organization set forth by the General Council of Congregational Christian Churches, or the following:

Third paragraph now reads:

Those who have signed the agreement as set forth in the Manual referred to above, or as set forth in this section . . .

Suggested change:

Those who have signed the agreement above . . .

SECTION III. Duties of Churches.

Fifth paragraph:

Every church should celebrate the Lord's Supper at least four times a year, preferably once a month.

Omit the phrase:

preferably once a month.

CHAPTER IV.--MINISTERS.

Section I, Candidates, reads as follows:

- 1. A candidate for the ministry in the churches of the Southern Convention shall make application to the Committee on the Ministry or similar committee of the Conference to which his church belongs.
- 2. Such candidate shall be of approved moral character and religious experience, shall give promise of ability to make suitable preparation, and shall be recommended by the church of which he is a member.
- 3. The Committee shall examine him as to his fitness and qualifications, and if he is accepted, shall have oversight of his training and preparation; and he shall report annually to the Committee. Failure to report, or to make satisfactory progress, shall be sufficient ground for dismissal from the roll of candidates.
- 4. All applications for aid from the Conference or Convention shall be presented through the Committee.
- 5. It shall be the duty of the secretaries of the Conferences to enroll the candidates for the ministry with the Secretary of the Convention, who will include their names in the Ministerial Directory of THE ANNUAL.

Change to include the following introduction to the chapter. Also make the following changes in Section I:

The ministry is the highest office in the Congregational Christian Churches. To it come the people who believe that God has called them to this specialized type of Christian service.

In the Southern Convention there are four divisions of the Christian ministry, each with its particular duties and responsibilities. A member of either group is entitled to all the rights and privileges of the ministry, limited only as stated in the following Sections.

- 1. Members of the Biblical Class (or "Candidates") are enrolled by Conference and are given the privilege of preaching wherever there is opportunity. Members may not serve as pastors of churches, but may work under the direction of an Elder.
- 2. A candidate must be a member of a church of the Conference in which he seeks membership, be recommended by his church, have good moral character, and show promise of becoming an effective minister.
- 3. Application must be made to the Coneference through the Committee on the Ministry. The committee will examine the candidate on his call to the ministry, his Christian experience, his knowledge of the Congregational Christian Churches, and his willingness and ability to pursue further training.
- 4. Candidates found worthy will be recommended to Conference in session, and if approved, will be directed in further education by the Committee on the Ministry.
- 5. Members will report to the Conference through the Committee on the Ministry annually. Failure to make report will indicate that the member no longer desires such standing, and he shall be dropped from the roll. Promotion from the Biblical Class to a Licentiate depends upon the progress made by the candidate.

Chapter IV, Section II.—Licentiates. 3. (b) now reads:

. . . his knowledge of the Principles and Government of the Convention.

Suggested change:

... his knowledge of the Principles and Government of the Convention and the organization of the denomination.

The phrase, "And the organization of the denomination," shall be added in a similar way in Section III. 3 and 5.

6. Now reads:

Only under emergency circumstances shall an Executive Board feel justified in granting licensure ad interim.

Change to:

Only under emergency circumstances shall an Executive Committee feel justified in granting licensure ad interim.

Section IV, Local or Conference Pastors. 1. Now reads:

In the case of persons not expecting to continue their education and who are not qualified for ordination as elders, but who testify to a call to preach and who are in respect to moral character and Christian experience well qualified, it is provided that they may be set apart as local or conference pastors and ordained as such.

Changed to read:

In the case of persons not expecting to qualify for ordination as elders, but who testify to a call to preach and who are in respect to moral character and Christian experience well qualified, it is provided that they may be set apart as local or conference pastors and licensed or ordained as such for one year.

2. Now reads:

Local or conference pastors shall have standing only in the conference or conferences ordaining them, and their standing in the conference shall be renewed annually.

Suggested that the word shall be changed to may.

3. Now reads:

If a local or conference pastor accept a call to a field within the bounds of another conference than that ordaining him, he shall forfeit his ministerial standing, unless by due procedure he secures like recognition and ordination from the other conference.

Suggested that the words, and ordination, be omitted.

It is recommended that the following be added to this section:

6. Local or conference pastors shall be expected to pursue a course of study as prescribed by the Committee on the Ministry.

CHAPTER V.--CONFERENCES.

Section I, Membership, 2. now is as follows:

Every church shall have lay representation, and each Conference shall fix its own ratio, provided that each church shall have at least one delegate and that no church shall have more than four.

Suggested change reads:

Every church shall have lay representation, and each Conference shall fix its own ratio. However, it is recommended that each church shall be entitled to two delegates. Churches having more than 200 members shall have an additional delegate for each 100 members, or major fraction thereof, provided that no church has more than four delegates.

Section II, Organization, 3, Suggested that the following sentence be omitted:

"An appropriate address should be delivered by the president.

Section IV, Business of Conference, 3, through 17, now reads:

- 3. Conference may appoint the following standing committees: Executive, Ministry, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Christian Education, Evangelism, Social Service, Religious Literature, Stewardship, Moral Reform, Superannuation, Apportionments, Ministerial Ethics, Memoirs, Woman's Board, a Board of Trustees, and others when deemed advisable.
- 4. The Committee on Ministry shall be composed of elders; all questions and matters pertaining to candidates for the ministry shall be under their charge; applicants for licensure or ordination shall be examined by them; and all ministers applying for admission into the Conference shall be referred to them.

- 5. The Committee on Home Missions shall have charge of all matters pertaining to Home Missions within the bounds of the Conference.
- 6. The Committee on Foreign Missions shall keep in touch with and report upon the Foreign Mission interests of the Congregational and Christian Churches.
- 7. The Committee on Christian Education shall report on the general condition of Sunday School work within the Conference and shall make recommendations for its development, with special emphasis upon the promotion of Leadership Training. It shall also include Christian Endeavor and Pilgrim Fellowship in its program of promotion and development, seeking to enlist the cooperation of young people in every department of our Church. It shall include also the interests of higher education, especially as they are represented in Elon College.
- 8. The Committee on Stewardship shall seek to promote the emphasis upon systematic giving, and otherwise develop the latent powers of life and service in the denomination.
- 9. The Committee on Moral Reform shall report and act upon the cause of temperance and other matters affecting the public or private morals of church members.
- 10. The Committee on Superannuation shall bring to the attention of the Conference the actions of the Convention related to the support of the ministry and the provision for the care of the retired and infirm ministers and the widows of ministers. It shall also make recommendations to the Board of Superannuation of the Convention concerning appropriations for assisting retired ministers of the Conference and the widows of ministers.
- 11. The Committee on Apportionments shall make a report each year on Conference Apportionments for the local churches, indicating the various amounts to be raised.
- 12. The Committee on Ministerial Ethics shall report on any matters pertaining to the moral and spiritual standards for the ministry.
- 13. The Committee on Memoirs shall report suitable resolutions upon the death of ministers or Conference officials each year.
- 14. The Committee on Evangelism shall endeavor to intensify the spiritual life of the churches, to awaken a general evangelistic spirit among them, to furnish evangelistic information, and to suggest a program.
- 15. The Committee on Social Service shall suggest service programs for the churches, that the church may be the community center in ministering to the whole life of the membership.
- 16. The Committee on Religious Literature shall assist in circulation of the church organ, denominational publications, and recommend the best literature for the people.
- 17. An Executive Committee of three, two of whom shall be elders, the president of the Conference being chairman, shall be appointed to transact necessary business between sessions of Conference.

Beginning with 3, it is recommended that this section shall read as follows:

- 3. Conferences should appoint the following Standing Committees: Executive, Ministry, Missions, Christian Education and Literature, Evangelism, Stewardship and Apportionment, Social Action, Memoirs, and others when deemed advisable. A Board of Trustees should be elected, if required by state law, or as may be determined by Conference. The duties of these committees are as follows:
- (a) The Executive Committee, two members of which shall be the president and secretary of the Conference. This committee shall transact necessary business between sessions of the Conference.
- (b) The Committee on Ministry shall be composed of elders; all questions and matters pertaining to candidates for the ministry shall be under their charge; applicants for licensure or ordination shall be examined by them; and all ministers applying for admission into the Conference shall be referred to them. The committee shall promote the interest of the ministry.
- (c) The Missions Committee shall have charge of all matters pertaining to Home Missions and Ministerial Relief within the bounds of the Conference; shall acquaint

the churches with the denominational work in Home Missions; shall keep in touch with and report upon the Foreign Mission interest of the denomination; and shall encourage adequate support for the missionary enterprise of the Conference, Convention and denomination.

- (d) The Committee on Christian Education and Literature shall report on the general condition of Sunday School work within the Conference and shall make recommendations for its development, with special emphasis upon the promotion of Leadership Training. It shall also include Christian Endeavor and Pilgrim Fellowship in its program of promotion and development, seeking to enlist the cooperation of young people in every department of our Church. It shall include also the interests of higher education, especially as they are represented in Elon College. The committee shall assist in the circulation of denominational publications and recommend the best literature for the people.
- (e) The Committee on Stewardship and Apportionment shall seek to promote the Christian principle in the acquisition and use of material possessions, time and talents; shall promote effective emphasis upon systematic giving for the support of the local church, Conference, Convention, and denominational program at home and abroad. The committee shall make a report each year on Conference Apportionments for the local churches, recommending the amounts to be raised by the churches for the enterprises of the Conference, Convention and denomination.
- (f) The Social Action Committee shall study the moral, social and economic health of the local community, state, nation and world, and shall suggest courses of action on all such matters; shall seek to promote peace, brotherhood, temperance; shall seek to promote consistent Christian attitudes and action on the part of church members in particular.
- (g) The Committee on Memoirs shall report suitable resolutions upon the death of ministers or Conference officials each year.
- (h) The Committee on Evangelism shall endeavor to intensify the spiritual life of the churches, to awaken a general evangelistic spirit among them, to furnish evangelistic information, and to suggest a program.

It is recommended that paragraph 18, in this section, shall be omitted. It reads as follows:

18. The Board of Trustees shall hold in trust for the Conference and local congregations such deeds as may be entrusted to it, and serve in other official capacities having to do with material values.

Paragraphs 19, 20, 21 and 22, of this section, shall be renumbered as paragraphs 4, 5, 6 and 7, respectively. Otherwise they shall be unchanged.

CHAPTER VI.—THE CONVENTION.

ARTICLE II.—Area.

This article reads:

The area of the Convention shall be the territory served by the constituent conferences, namely: Virginia Valley Central, Eastern Virginia, Eastern North Carolina, Western North Carolina, North Carolina and Virginia.

It is suggested that the following phrase be added:

. . . ; and, or such others as authorized or recognized by the Southern Convention.

ARTICLE VIII.—Officers.

Section 3 reads:

Election and Term of Office. At least three months before each biennial session, the Executive Board shall elect a Nominating Committee. This committee shall nominate all officers of the Convention, except the Superintendent, who shall be nominated by the Executive Board, and the Editor of The Christian Sun, who shall be nominated by the Board of Publications. Nominations may also be made from the floor for any office. Officers and Board members shall be elected to serve for the biennium unless otherwise designated, or until their successors are elected and qualified.

Suggested change:

Election and Term of Office. All officers and Board members, except the Superintendent, who shall be nominated by the Executive Board, and the Editor of The Christian Sun, who shall be nominated by the Board of Publications, shall be elected by the Convention upon nomination of the Nominating Committee, but nominations for any office may also be made from the floor. They shall be elected to serve for the biennium unless otherwise designated, or until their successors are elected and qualified.

Section 4, Duties, reads:

The Superintendent shall be a . . . He shall be a member ex-officio, without vote, of all Convention Boards and Committees, and of Boards of Convention Institutions.

Suggested change:

. . . He shall be a member ex-officio, without vote, of all Convention Boards and Committees, and of the Boards of Trustees of Elon College, the Christian Orphanage, and of the Boards of other Convention Institutions.

ARTICLE X.—Boards.

Section 2, Mission Board, reads:

Section 2. Mission Board. This Board shall work according to the purposes of its charter for the promotion of missionary activity among the churches, and shall serve as the Extension Division of the Convention. This Board shall be composed of eleven members, ten members elected by the Convention, five of whom shall be elected biennially for a term of four years, and one of whom shall be the president of the Woman's Board. This Board shall have representatives from all constitutent conferences.

Section 4, Board of Superannuation, reads:

Section 4. Board of Superannuation. This Board shall survey the needs and promote the adequate support for the Convention's retired and disabled ministers and their dependents. Its current funds shall be administered through the Division of Ministerial Relief of the Board of Home Missions of Congregational Christian Churches, the Board of Superannuation recommending beneficiaries for such grants. The Board shall endeavor to enroll all ministers of the Convention in the Annuity Fund of the denomination.

Suggested amendment, combine the two sections as Section 2, Mission Board, reading as follows:

Section 2. Mission Board. This Board shall work according to the purposes of its charter for the promotion of missionary education and activity among the churches and conferences. It shall serve as the Church Extension and Ministerial Relief Divisions of the Convention. In addition to its usual work for the interests of Home and Foreign Missions, it shall survey the needs and promote adequate support for the Convention's retired and disabled ministers and their dependents. Its current funds designated for Ministerial Relief (or Superannuation) shall be administered through the Division of Ministerial Relief of the Board of Home Missions of Congregational Christian Churches, and the Board shall designate a committee from its members to receive applications for, and recommend to the Board beneficiaries for grants from the National Board.

This board shall be composed of fifteen members, fourteen members elected by the Convention, seven of whom shall be elected biennially for a term of four years, and one of whom shall be the president of the Woman's Missionary Convention. As far as possible the Board shall have representatives from all constituent conferences.

Section 5, Board of Publications becomes Section 4. The last sentence reads:

. . . It shall be composed of five members, elected biennially by classes.

It is suggested that the last sentence shall read:

. . . It shall be composed of six members, elected in two classes.

Section 6, which concerns the Christian Orphanage and Elon College, shall become Section 5. It is recommended that the last phrase of the section, "... and shall report biennially to the Convention," shall be omitted.

Section 7. Add "and Institutions" in first line and omit "6" in second line. This section becomes Section 6.

ARTICLE XI.—Committees.

Section 2, Special Committees, sub-section b, reads:

b. Nominating, composed of five members appointed by the Executive Board at least three months before the regular session of the Convention. This committee shall make nominations of all officers of the Convention, and members of Boards, except those otherwise provided for.

Suggested change: The word "appointed," shall be changed to "elected."

By-Laws.

Section 6, Executive Board, reads:

The Executive Board shall meet in regular annual sessions in October and April, the exact time and place . . .

Suggested change:

The Executive Board shall meet twice each year, the exact time and place . . .

Section III, Subsection 2, reads:

A church found guilty of charges may be admonished, censured, or cut off from the Conference; but the sentence against a church should not involve members who protest against the offense with which the church is charged. A church cut off may be restored by repentance and application.

The competency of witnesses shall be determined by the court of trial in all cases.

Suggested change: Following the words, "the church is charged," the sub-section shall read:

... When a church is dismissed, the conference should claim title to the property in accordance with Chapter III—Local Church Property. A church which has been dismissed may be restored by repentence and application. The competency of witnesses shall be determined by the court of trial in all cases.

* *

This committee recommends that the Convention appoint a Revisions Committee to prepare the script for printing the revised *Manual* and to present the same to the Executive Board for approval and printing.

W. J. Andes, Chairman, F. C. Lester, Mrs. W. E. Wisseman.

The attention of the Convention was called to the illness of Dr. Wm. Moseley Brown of Elon College and of Rev. Park W. Fisher of Sanford, N. C., and the secretary was instructed to write letters of sympathy to these brethren.

The report on the Superintendent's Home was received and made a part of the records. It was stated that the balance due on the loan with the Building Society of the Board of Home Missions, New York, as of 2-17-52, was \$5,525.

The report on Moonelon was presented by the chairman of the committee, Rev. H. E. Robinson, as follows:

REPORT OF MOONELON COMMITTEE.

A property located 34 of a mile from Elon College, N. C., valued at approximately \$35,000.00, consisting of 17 acres of land, a concrete swimming pool 40 x 120 feet, a lodge and a caretaker's dwelling, a pond of about three acres, and a right of way into the property were given last spring to the Southern Convention by Mr. and Mrs.

W. W. Sellers of the First Christian Church of Burlington. Electric current and city water service the property. Whereas the Convention has complete possession of the property and facilities, full possession will not accrue until 1954, as ¼ of the value is being turned over by deed each year. The wills of Mr. and Mrs. Sellers are written so as to provide that full ownership be given the Convention, in event of their death prior to 1954.

The donors have given these holdings for the purpose of developing a Conference Center for the youth of our churches. All the agencies of the Southern Convention shall have use of the property.

The Executive Board of the Convention accepted this property on behalf of the Convention, and appointed this Committee to handle the affairs of Moonelon, being responsible to the Convention. Under the direction of the Committee the following things have been done:

- 1. The property has been surveyed and lines established.
- 2. A student was employed during the Summer of 1951, who directed various work projects consisting of repairs, painting and cleaning up, and had general supervision of groups using the grounds.
 - 3. Insurance of \$4,000.00 has been put on the buildings.
 - 4. A family is living on the grounds as caretakers.
 - 5. Numerous groups have used the property for parties and picnics.
 - 6. An additional four acres of land have been purchased at a cost of \$500.00.
- 7. Preliminary plans for a central dining room and assembly hall, cabins, bath and toilet rooms have been drawn.

The Committee recommends that the following items be accomplished in the near future:

- 1. That a student worker be in charge of the property for the Summer.
- 2. That funds be collected from laymen's groups and other interested organizations and individuals for the purpose of paying the obligations incurred thus far and for further development suitable for young people's work.
- a. The men of Union Church (N. C.) have already raised \$125.00, and this may be a challenge to other groups.
- b. In another report (Laymen's Fellowship) a capital sum of \$25,000.00 is being proposed as a goal for the men of Convention to raise for Moonelon. We hope the Laymen's Fellowship will approve this undertaking and that the Convention will concur in it.
- 3. That Moonelon be incorporated and a Board of Trustees be elected by the Convention, in order that the Convention as a whole will not be liable in case of suits for damages that may occur on the premises.

About \$2,000.00 is needed for present obligations and the Summer program.

On motion, it was adopted and the Nominating Committee was instructed to nominate a board of trustees.

The report of the Committee on Social Action was presented by Dr. R. L. House and on motion was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL ACTION.

The Prophet Amos cried out, "Let judgment roll down as waters and righteousness as a mighty stream."

We call upon the churches of our generation to heed the prophets who pronounce judgments and call for refreshing streams of righteousness. The Church cannot be true to its historic mission without seeking to keep alive a social conscience. The Church in every generation must concern itself with the role of Christian principles in daily work. Our particular age has been threatened by such social evils as Universal Military Control, narcotics addiction, juvenile delinquency, corruption in private and public life. Our people would do well to study the U. S. Senate sub-committee's report on "Ethical Standards in Government."

Those who desire literature or speakers on the problems of alcohol should write to the Virginia Church Temperance Council, 311 W. Grace Street, Richmond, Va., whose motto is "Educate, Agitate, Legislate."

We urge that every church have a Social Action Committee, composed of level-headed, trusted, but progressive leadership.

One of the unavoidable social problems of our age is that of race relations. While the problem is not limited to the South, it is concentrated in the South. What, specifically, are we of the Southern Convention doing to improve race relations? The negative approach is totally inadequate. It is futile to go on simply denying charges that are hurled at us and denouncing those who propose reforms. We have a stewardship of influence to discharge. We may not be responsible for the pattern that has been set before us, but we are responsible for the part we play in this, our southern democracy.

Where can one who is interested take hold of this problem? How can one take a positive approach, alter undesirable patterns, and establish new ones? What can a church do in response to the biblical question, "Am I my brother's keeper?" If a church is genuinely disturbed about its sins of omission and commission, how can it begin to make amends? We of the South may not be able or willing to do all that our absentee specialists demand of us. We must do the minimum before we can do the maximum. The following proposals will not be acceptable to the idealist, but they do indicate an immediate point of departure:

- 1. Begin in the Sunday school with a program of teaching against intolerance, and explain Jesus' teachings about human brotherhood.
- 2. Observe Race Relations Sunday and make an offering for Franklinton Center.
- 3. Arrange for fraternal delegates at conferences and conventions; keep the door open for constant and friendly counsel on a Christian basis. Multiply interracial acquaintances. Substitute Christianity for Jim Crowism.
- 4. Seek to purify democracy at the grass roots. Urge fair play between races. Take your turn at the business counter or ticket window. Throw the weight of your influence against discrimination. Correct erroneous views concerning Negroes.
- 5. White churches can get acquainted, or better acquainted, with Negro churches in their community, especially the churches of our own denomination. Find common ground. Ascertain their needs. Remember, "The strong should bear the burdens of the weak." Assist them in times of difficulty or great undertaking. Take cognizance of their anniversaries, victories.
- 6. Study the problem. Report your findings and your achievements. "Let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works and glorify your Father which is in heaven."

R. L. House, Chairman.

Rev. Richard L. Jackson presented a motion in commendation of the Council for Social Action of the General Council which was seconded by

Dr. H. Shelton Smith. A motion to amend by adding "that we urge the Council for Social Action to be more uncompromising in working for peace" was offered. On motion that the whole matter be tabled, a division was called for and on standing vote the motion to table was passed by a 35 to 30 vote.

The report of the Committee on Evangelism and Spiritual Life was adopted and made a part of the minutes as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM AND DEVOTIONAL LIFE.

Your Committee on Evangelism and Devotional Life is happy to report that most of our pastors and churches place commendable emphasis upon the work of Evangelism and Devotional Life. We are convinced that the churches which place consistent emphasis on the Devotional Life are the churches which automatically lay the strongest emphasis upon the work of Evangelism—the recruiting of new witnesses for the faith and new members for the church.

We recommend that each church in the Convention, during the coming biennium, major in the work of Evangelism—each church using whichever method or methods that seem most practical for the particular situation they serve. For some churches, a comprehensive program of Visitation Evangelism will be of largest service; for others a Preaching Mission, for others a Membership Enlistment Campaign covering a definite period of time; for other churches a Revival Meeting may be what is needed. And in some churches, all the various techniques may be used to advantage.

But we feel that every church should recognize its responsibility in Evangelism; that every church should be "a recruiting station" for the Kingdom of God. We furthermore believe that the more churches and individuals appreciate and practice a sincere and intelligent Devotional Life, the greater will be their interest and activity in the work of Evangelism. Evangelism and prayer are inseparable.

Evangelism is not the responsibility of the pastor alone—it is the responsibility of every person whose name is on a church roll—the responsibility to recommend the Christian Way of Life and one's church to the non-church people of one's community. No professional revivalist can relieve any church or any pastor of the evangelistic responsibility which is theirs.

Naturally we must reckon with the fact that many of the churches of the Convention are far removed from each other, and the fact that no provision is made for expenses involved in calling together the chairmen of Evangelism from the various conferences for a two day's Evangelistic Seminar to plan together for a vigorous evangilistic promotion campaign throughout the Convention. But such provision needs to be made each year.

During the past biennium your Committee on Evangelism has provided evangelistic material from time to time for *The Christian Sun*. The chairman has given counsel on occasion to pastors asking for guidance in promoting their program of Evangelism in their local churches.

The chairman, at his own expense, had leaflets printed of his outline on "What the Church Has to Offer" and mailed them to all pastors of the Convention. These leaflets can be used to good advantage by the local church committees on Evangelism by placing the leaflet in the hands of prospective members.

We would further recommend that provisions be made for sending teams of two men each to the various conferences of the Convention for a two day's seminar on Evangelism and the Devotional Life during the early fall—pastors and church officials to be in attendance at these seminars, which should be for the purpose of presenting for intensive study and prayerful consideration the larger place Evangelism should have in all our churches during these critical times through which the world is now passing, and for the purpose of reviewing, evaluating and appropriating the various techniques and methods of evangelism most practicable for churches in contemporary life.

We would further recommend "The Pastor's Class" during the Lenten Season for preparing intermediate boys and girls for church membership. Many pastors have found such a class for adults also definitely rewarding.

The report of the Commission on Stewardship was adopted and made a part of the minutes as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON STEWARDSHIP.

The need for courageous action on the part of individual Christians and the church at large has never been more apparent than now. As the greatest danger to our national life and progress is not from without, but from internal weakness, so, the greatest danger to the Church of Christ is that those of us who have its welfare in our grasp may fail to see the urgency of the times and adopt the attitude that we are doing as well as usual. We know, however, that the "usual" or "average" progress of the church is not a good criterion. The "average" is far below what the Christian conscience should accept as being even a reasonable portion of our duty and privilege.

We are happy to report that during the closing biennium there has been a noticeable increase in the practice of the Stewardship Life. Many individuals have shown concern and have given of their time and substance that the Convention program might keep its stride forward. It is to be remembered that these individuals are members of local churches, and that their influence at home has strengthened the home base. If we can continue to bring forth the fruits of Stewardship Living, we shall have less need to worry about Stewardship Giving, but few things bring forth a stronger desirefor Christian living than the job resulting from Christian giving.

More churches, each year, are making better plans for their financial obligations and opportunities. They are, one by one, getting down to the serious business of planning budgets and holding institutes for the training of their canvassers, and are conducting successful Every-Member Canvasses. But the process needs to be speeded up While we are showing yearly increases in our gifts for all purposes, the average church is giving not more than half what it could, and would give, if proper methods of Stewardship Education were made available to it. Not to develop this potential in the thirty-five thousand members of the churches of our Convention is to willfully continue our plea of poverty and fail to give the support to our program of advancement and extension they so richly deserve.

Therefore:

- 1. As the best and wisest means to this desired end, we recommend that the Convention, at its 1952 session, take seriously the proposal of the Finance Committee that a Secretary of Stewardship and Evangelism be elected and put on the field to give full time to the development of our spiritual lives and financial resources. Such a move would speed up the present gains in finances, and would be a means of restoring the spirit of Evangelism to our churches. That this evangelistic note needs to be restored is evidenced by the static situation which has concerned us for years, when the population of the area served has grown by thousands, and our membership has increased only by dozens—often showing a decrease.
- 2. The Stewardship Clinics for ministers sponsored last fall by the Convention and your Commission on Stewardship proved a great help to local churches and postors. We recommend that these efforts be continued, and that pastors be urged to procure expert leadership to conduct Stewardship Institutes in

- every local church in the Convention, and to take full advantage of the abundance of good literature for a year-round program of Stewardship Education in all types of churches.
- 3. Knowing that a great reservoir of untapped strength lies dormant in the laymen of our churches of the Convention, we recommend that the Laymen's Fellowship of the Southern Convention be asked to sponsor training institutes for the laymen of the five conferences of the Convention, challenging them with the need for their services and showing them a systematic way by which their talents and money can be used for the strengthening of their local church programs, and for the wider needs of the Fellowship.
- 4. Since Stewardship Living and Giving, like acceptance of Christ as one's personal Saviour, must begin with the individual, we recommend that each member of every church examine his own attitudes and actions in the light of his abilities and opportunities to be of greater service to his local church, and through it to the larger interests of the Convention and the world-wide fellowship of churches as they seek to meet the needs of mankind for Christ.

The report of the Board of Superannuation was read and a motion was offered that it be adopted. A motion to amend by deleting the names of ministers and widows receiving aid was made but failed to pass. The report was adopted as presented as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SUPERANNUATION.

The Board of Superannuation receives its principal financial support from the apportionment and the Christmas offering. In addition to the current income, the Board holds the sum of \$2,500.00 in an Investment Share Certificate No. 1967, dated July 23, 1949, in the First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Burlington, N. C., made payable to The Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, George D. Colclough, Treasurer. The interest on this certificate and the current income of the Board are forwarded regularly to the Division of Ministerial Relief of the Board of Home Missions of Congregational Christian Churches, New York. Pensions and emergency grants are made by the Division of Ministerial Relief upon recommendation of the Board of Superannuation.

During the calendar years of 1950 and 1951, our retired ministers and widows continued to receive much more than the amount the Southern Convention contributed to the Division of Ministerial Relief. Here is the picture for 1950 and 1951:

Total receipts by the Board for Superannuation and Christmas Fund, and disbursements to the Division of Ministerial Relief, \$9,494.04. Total payments to pensioners of the Convention and in emergency grants, \$17,235.00. Of this aid, \$12,211.00 went to regular pensions: \$7,890.00 to retired ministers, and \$4,321.00 to widows of ministers. In addition, the sum of \$5,024.00 was paid to our retired and disabled ministers, and ministers' widows from the Christmas Fund.

The following persons received aid during the years 1950 and 1951:

Ministers—D. P. Barrett, B. J. Earp (deceased), Park W. Fisher, Thomas J. Green, I. W. Johnson, Clyde O. Koon (illness), G. O. Lankford, D. R. Moffitt, J. F. Morgan (deceased), J. L. Neese, C. E. Newman, N. G. Newman, George Olejar (deceased), J. Q. Pugh (illness), Herbert Scholz (deceased), C. C. Thomas (wife's illness), R. L. Williamson.

Ministers' Widows—Mrs. J. S. Carden, Mrs. B J. Earp, Mrs. James L. Foster, Mrs. Luther B. Grice, Mrs. W. D. Howard, Mrs. J. W. Knight, Mrs. Frank H. Lewis,

Mrs. T. N. Lowe, Mrs. Ebbie Moffitt, Mrs. J. F. Morgan, Mrs. George Olejar, Mrs. Herbert Scholz, Mrs. Martha S. White, Mrs. W. C. Wicker, Mrs. L. L. Wyrick.

It may be plainly seen that we are falling far short in our gifts to Superannuation and the Christmas Fund. In the two-year period, our ministers and widows received \$7,740.96 more from the Division of Ministerial Relief than we contributed. We are

not proud of that picture!

The General Council in 1934 took action to encourage Congregational Christian ministers to "aid themselves" by joining the Annuity Fund of the denomination, thereby relieving the Division of Ministerial Relief as much as possible. Accordingly the 1934 action of the General Council restricted eligibility for ministerial relief to ministers or widows of ministers born before 1872. In 1941, this action was amended to except ministers or their widows "whose standing prior to the merger of the Congregational and Christian churches was in the Christian Church and who, on January 1, 1939, were fifty years or more of age (making any Christian Church minister eligible who was born earlier than January 1, 1889)."

Since the Southern Convention administered its own ministerial relief funds through the Board of Superannuation until June 1, 1948, when we began working through the Division of Ministerial Relief of the Board of Home Missions, these rules did not affect our ministers. It should be said that the officers of the Division of Ministerial Relief (Dr. Frank J. Scribner and Rev. Percy C. Ladd) have never pressed this matter. Instead, they have always been generous and considerate of any application sent to them by our Board. However, in good conscience, your Board felt it only right and proper that we cooperate with the rules affecting our ministers over the country. Therefore, we requested Dr. Scribner to take the matter under advisement and to ask his Foard to make a ruling to which we might subscribe. Accordingly, the Division of Ministerial Relief and the Board of Home Missions on December 5, 1950, passed the following vote:

"That the action of the General Council at Oberlin in 1934, with respect to appropriation of funds by the Congregational Board of Ministerial Relief be interpreted as permitting a further exception in the case of ministers whose standing on January 1, 1945, was in the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches and who on that date were 50 or more years of age (that is, ministers born earlier than

January 1, 1895.)"

The Board of Superannuation and the Executive Board of the Convention have concurred in these actions, and we recommend that this session of Convention adopt

these rules of our Board of Home Missions and the General Council.

We urge our churches and members to be more generous in their gifts for the aid of our retired and disabled servants, and especially do we urge our churches to receive a liberal offering at Christmas time.

We wish to commend the action of the Executive Board and Superintendent Scott in effecting the Group Life and Hospitalization Plan through the Home Life Insurance Company of New York for pastors and other full time employees of the churches, conferences and Convention, and the Group Hospitalization and Surgical Benefits for dependents of these persons.

We strongly urge all our pastors to participate in the Group Insurance Plan of the Convention and to become members of the Annuity Fund of our denomination.

Ministers as citizens are tax payers and members of our society. We believe that ordained ministers should be eligible for Social Security benefits under the plan of our Federal Government. We recommend that the Southern Convention by vote request the proper officials of our denomination to take appropriate action to help give this security to the Christian ministers.

We endorse the recommendations of the Revisions Committee, whereby the work of the Board of Superannuation and the Mission Board may be combined. We believe this to be a logical step in the unifying of our work with the denomination.

D. R. FONVILLE, Chairman, J. T. KERNODLE, W. T. MADREN, E. J. ROHART, PHILLIP J. WEAVER. The report of the Woman's Missionary Convention was received and made a part of the record as follows:

REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY CONVENTION.

As I bring to you the report of the Woman's Missionary Convention for the biennium 1949-1951, I express the gratitude of all the women of the Convention for the efforts of my predecessor, Mrs. O. H. Paris. She led us untivingly, patiently, efficiently, and with an humble spirit into a well-rounded program of worship, education, service and giving as we were seeking to undergird the general program of the Southern Convention as it serves the cause of Christ within its own bounds, and throughout the world. This report covers the second biennium of Mrs. Paris' term of office as President of the Woman's Missionary Convention.

During the biennium all rallies and conferences were held. The Spring Rallies in 1950 were combined in each Conference, and Family Life Institutes were conducted with Dr. Paul Reynolds, National Family Life Secretary, as the speaker. In addition to the regular scheduled meetings, "One-Day Mission Institutes" have also been held.

The Fifth Annual School of Missions was held at Elon College in June, 1950, and the Sixth Annual School in June, 1951. Each of these Schools had an attendance of approximately 130 women and their leaders. The programs were well-planned, bringing to our women the very best of speakers, including high-ranking leaders in our own denomination and others. Plans are now under way for the Seventh Annual School of Missions to be held at Elon College, July 8-11, 1952.

The Twentieth Biennial Session of the Woman's Missionary Convention was held at the Congregational Christian Temple, Norfolk, Virginia, May 1-2, 1951. Using the theme, "A Highway for Our God," the program was well-planned, giving us a maximum of information and inspiration. The reports showed progress and renewed interest in all phases of our work.

The treasurer's report for 1949-1951 showed our women had contributed \$36,931.78 to the church's program and missionary enterprises. This was an increase of approximatly \$1,500.00 over the preceding biennium.

Our 1949 Thank Offering was designated for the Han Mei School in Shaowu. \$3,260.09 was raised for this project. (Since all this money could not be used for the Han Mei School, due to the situation in China, the balance of \$2,200.00 has been designated toward the work of Miss Corrine Norquest in the Johannesburg area of our South Africa Mission.)

Our 1950 Thank Offering was designated for repairing and renovating the Whitley Memorial Auditorium at Elon College. The amount given for this project was \$3,667.82.

For the past two bienniums the money received from our Life Membership and Memorial Funds was used for Timothy Chang's seminary education at Duke Divinity School. Beginning the new biennium, the money received for this fund has been designated to renovate the buildings at Franklinton Center.

During the 1949-1951 biennium Friendly Service Gifts were sent to the migrants, to Japan, to Franklinton Center, and to the Near East. Many societies also made special gifts to Community Projects and to their own churches.

A large number of our groups have taken the initiative in planning for the World Day of Prayer, May Fellowship, and World Community Day Programs in their areas—thus strengthening our desire for unity among our denominations.

Our women have shown a fine spirit of cooperation as they have planned their programs, using the Bible and Mission Study books and programs that have been recommended to them.

We have been represented at the meeting of the General Council, the Mid-Winter Sessions of the Missions Council, The General Assembly of Congregational Christian and Evangelical and Reformed Women (meeting in Cleveland, Ohio, in 1949), and at the Constituting Convention of the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U. S. A.

This report includes only a part of the things which are among the field of interest and concern of the Woman's Missionary Convention as we dedicate our lives to do His will while we strive to build "A Highway for Our God." We realize that we work with vision and a purpose only as we see each part in relationship to the whole.

The report of the Laymen's Fellowship was received with the amendment that it would not be necessary to refer the matter of the \$25,000 compaign for funds to the various Conferences for approval. The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE LAYMEN'S FELLOWSHIP.

The third Sunday in October of each year has been observed as Laymen's Sunday throughout the Southern Convention. Our churches have been very cooperative and, in most cases, laymen have conducted either the morning or evening service on Laymen's Sunday.

In January, 1951, we had a special meeting of the laymen on the Convention, with every conference represented and approximately 600 in attendance at Elon College. This was a very inspirational and beneficial meeting for our men.

Many area conferences or group meetings of laymen have been held during the past biennium. We appreciate the encouragement given our laymen by our ministers and we are grateful for the fine leadership we have had in our local churches and conferences.

At each annual meeting of the conferences of the Convention, time has been allotted for presentation of the work of the Laymen's Fellowship. We are grateful to our conference presidents and officials for this recognition and opportunity of presenting our work to them.

Many fine things have been done by the Laymen's Fellowship of the Southern Convention, and many more worthwhile projects can and will be undertaken during the next few years. There is a great field of service and a great need for our laymen to be active in the local church, which will have its influence on the entire program of the Southern Convention.

At the biennial session of the Laymen's Fellowship held here in Durham on April 29, the following officers were elected for the 1952-54 biennium:

Chairman—W. B. Williams, 1253 24th Street, Newport News, Va. Vice-Chairman—Prof. J. Earl Danieley, Elon College N. C. Secretary-Treasurer—S. H. Pell, Rt. 1, Ramseur, N. C.

The following recommendations of the Laymen's Council were adopted, and they are presented to the Convention for its endorsement:

- 1. Moonelon—(1) That the Laymen's Fellowship of the Southern Convention undertake the development of the physical equipment of "Moonelon" as a Convention Center for Young People's Conferences, Laymen's Meetings, Women's Meetings, Elon College Students, Orphanage Children, and for any other church group of the Southern Convention.
 - (2) That the Laymen's Fellowship ask permission of the Convention to sponsor a campaign to raise \$25,000.00 for this purpose, and that the Laymen's Council be authorized to set up such organization as necessary to raise the funds.

- Insurance for Pastors—'That we commend the officials of the Convention in
 effecting the Group Insurance Plan for pastors and their dependents, and
 urge all churches to pay their share of the insurance, that our ministers may
 be protected.
- 3. Elon College Sustaining Fund—That we heartily endorse the action of the Southern Convention in setting up the Sustaining Fund for Elon College, and that we urge our churches to make an earnest effort during the College Period to raise in full the Sustaining Fund of \$1.00 per member during the conference year; and that men's classes, clubs and other organizations in the local churches lend their assistance to this worthy undertaking.
- Meetings—That a Convention-Wide Meeting be held annually in the midwinter at Elon College; and that regional and conference meetings be held regularly.
- 5. Finances—That an operating budget for the Laymen's Fellowship of the Convention be set up, and in order that this might be done, we further recommend that each local layman pay to his local church's Laymen's Fellowship a membership fee of \$1.00 per year, and that this membership fee be divided one-half for the local group and one-helf be paid to the Treasurer of the Convention Laymen's Fellowship.

The report of the Pilgrim Fellowship was received and made a part of the record as follows:

REPORT OF THE YOUTH FELLOWSHIP.

During the past two years the Southern Convention Youth Fellowship has endeavored to carry on a program which is in keeping with the purpose and the plans of the National Council of Pilgram Fellowship and at the same time adapted to the needs of the local organizations.

The Seventh National Council of Pilgrim Fellowship, meeting in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, was attended by five delegates from the Southern Convention. Those delegates returned home to explain and to put into practice the plans of the National Council. In order to do this reports were given to Conference rallies and also to local groups. An officers' training camp was held at Camp Crabtree so that the delegates might help incorporate the national program into the Convention program.

In the last biennium the Youth Council, whose officers are Warren Matthews, president; John Truitt, Jr., treasurer; and Max Vestal, editor of youth publications, has promoted two separate missionary programs. In the fall of 1950 Max Vestal, who under the sponsorship of the Youth Fellowship, spent the summer in a work camp at Agape, Italy, toured the Convention reporting on some af the achievements and needs of present-day Europe.

January 1, 1951, was the opening date for the Philippine Project. This is a campaign in which the Youth Fellowship set a goal of \$2,500 for the education of a Philippine student. The amount of the goal was divided among the conferences according to their ability. On January 1, 1952, the half-way mark of the campaign, more than half of the goal had been realized; there is every reason to believe that the goal will be reached before December 30, 1952. Mr. Jose Dabuet, the student from the Philippines, is now a student at Princeton Theological Seminary. He has spoken at rallies in the Convention, and he will be available in the Summer months to visit organizations and to help in mission work.

The Youth Fellowship groups have been holding conference meetings regularly. The attendance of these groups has reached a high quantity, and the programs have developed into a high quality. But it was the feeling on the part of able Conference presidents that the Youth Fellowship needed greater unity. So in the years 1951 and 1952 state-wide youth rallies were held in Richmond for Virginia and in Elon College for North Carolina. Those were perhaps the largest gatherings of young people in the history of the Convention.

All of these programs and plans have been executed to aid the local organizations. It has been the work of the Youth Fellowship to carry on a program that challenges the highest development of Christian character, that calls forth young people to give their best to their Christ and to His Church.

The report of the Committee on the Ministry was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE MINISTRY.

"But the Laborers are few." This clause describes the situation in our churches with respect to ministerial leadership. Our need for ministers has become critical. But that is not all; the number of candidates in the process of training is entirely inadequate even to maintain the present supply. In short, unless we can double the number of recruits to the ministry, it can hardly be hoped that the present condition will improve. Your Convention Committee on the Ministry would be remiss if it failed to call attention to this crisis that threatens our churches. Many committees are prepared and anxious to employ full-time pastoral service, but qualified ministers are not available. The tendency is for the more favored committees to attract the men that are available and to leave the less fortunate churches without pastoral leadership. How can the opening of new churches be urged or justified when there are not sufficient pastors to care for the present ones?

Certainly the time has come for us to give voice to the prayer of Jesus, "that the Lord of harvest send forth laborers unto the harvest." To pray this prayer, however, is not simply to utter a wish. Jesus did not merely wish that he had leaders. Rather, his prayer expressed a concern about which he did something. What if our prayer for laborers should likewise express a concern. What if we should become determined to do something about it? How might this concern over the supply of pastors be translated into terms of action? Here are some suggestions which your Committee wishes to present:

- 1. Determine to make your own minister a great religious leader. Is it not an established fact that great churches bring out the qualities of greatness that are in their pastors? This rather typical confession is taken from the autobiography of one of our finest ministers, Rev. Leon H. Austin: "They made me what I became . . . and I was certainly immeasurably greater mentally and spiritually at the end of those twelve years than when I came to them."*

 Young people impressed by the figure of their own minister and the way he is supported by his people can hardly escape the suggestion to consider the ministry as a life's work.
- Present the ministry as a calling to young people upon every possible occasion.
 (One Sunday a quarter might be profitably devoted to a discussion of the minister and his task.)
- Cultivate the acquaintance of possible recruits, and provide them with contacts that will deepen their interest in and understanding of the Gospel Ministry.
- 4. Make available to young people books and other literature which interpret the work of the ministry.
- 5. Strive toward a wholesome and tranquil local church life. Who could estimate the number of young people who have been disuaded from their purpose to become ministers by unfortunate experiences of pettiness and strife in their own churches?
- 6. Anything which magnifies the importance of the church and its ministry can be relied upon to help answer the prayer for "laborers unto the harvest."

In addition to this most urgent matter, your committee has considered the question of ministerial standing and credentials for non-preaching ministers such as teach-

ers and chaplains. Consulation with the Conference Superintendents and other leaders and officials of the Denomination revealed that the accepted policy is for each case to be dealt with by the authorized Conference Committee or Association as a special problem.

Further, your Committee has begun work on a two-year Conference Study Course for ministers. Outlines of the course and suggested bibliographies are already being used. It is hoped that the proper organization for administering this Conference Study Course may be completed within the next conference year.

The report of the Ministerial Loan Fund was on motion adopted, with the amendment that item No. 2 with reference to the cancellation of an item of \$1,165.95 due from the General Fund of the College be deleted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL LOAN FUND.

During the past two years, we have made an effort through Hon. Mills E. Godwin, Jr., and Superintendent Wm. T. Scott to collect the dilinquent notes. Some success has been achieved. Of the notes dated prior to 1935, some have been settled on a fifty per cent basis as authorized by the 1948 Convention (Item 11, pages 47-48). Others we are attempting to settle. Of the loans now currently made, negotiable notes for not more than one year are signed. These may be renewed at the discretion of the committee.

The status of the fund, as of April 11, 1952, as certified to by W. E. Butler, Business Manager of Elon College, for the college as custodian, is as follows:

Report of the Committee on Home Missions:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Annual Conference might well be considered a time for taking inventory; for that is indeed really one of the purposes for which it is held. The theme of this session of our Conference, namely, "Let Us Rise Up and Build," should constitute a challenge to our loyalty and devotion to the "Master Builder."

Some things have been accomplished which were planned at last year's session, one of which, is a pastor for Timber Ridge Church, and a Pastor-at-Large for the entire Conference. Rev. Henry V. Harman is serving in these two capacities. For this accomplishment we feel indebted to the New York office and to Dr. Scott: we hereby express to them our gratitude.

We wish to recognize the splendid work the Women's Missionary Societies are doing, and we feel that much credit is due them for the accomplishments attained.

We believe that most of our church properties are in the best state of repair that they have been at any time; however, there is much yet to be done.

We, therefore, recommend:

- 1. That each church continue its efforts to acquire the necessary facilities for the building of a better church, materially and spiritually.
- 2. That this Conference appropriate \$500.00 to Mt. Lebanon Church on their building program, and that we ask the Mission Board of the Southern Convention for \$1,000.00 on same. The building now in use is entirely inadequate for the growing Sunday School and congregation.
- 3. That the appropriation for salary aid from the Conference Fund and the Mission Board be left in the hands of the Home Missions Committee and the Executive Committee with power to act.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Christians should become deeply concerned that our increasing prosperity should not make us unmindful of the increasing poverty of millions of our brothers in other lands. Our increasing number of new churches should be a cause for rejoicing, but we should view with alarm the fact that there are still multitudes of our fellowmen who have never heard of our Lord and who have no churches at all.

These conditions constitute a challenge to us to obey our Lord's command to "Go and make disciples of all nations." There is work to do, more missionaries are

needed, more offerings could be made and more prayers offered.

We have made some progress in our giving. In 1942 our total giving for the Valley Conference to Missions was \$368.00, while in 1951 we gave \$1,069.00—almost three times as much. In proportion to increased wages and salaries this is not a large gain.

Our responsibility is a great one, our opportunity is here, our ability is yet to be tested. Our willingness—What about it?

"Cast your bread upon the waters, for thou shalt find it after many days."—Ecclesiastes 11:1.

THURSDAY—MORNING SESSION.

A motion was carried to accept the following resolution introduced by Rev. R. A. Whitten:

RESOLUTION.

In accordance with the action of the Executive Board of the Southern Convention approving the Convention quota of \$135,000.00 in the Church Building Loan Fund Campaign of \$4,500,000.00 authorized by the General Council of Congregational Christian Churches, and in accordance with the recommendation of the Finance Committee of the Southern Convention that the Virginia Valley Central Conference accept a quota of \$5,736.00 in this campaign.

Be it resolved:

- 1. That the Conference accept the said quota.
- 2. That the Conference designate as its Campaign Committee the following persons: Clarence A. Phillips, chairman; Mrs. R. A. Whitten, associate chairman; R. E. Newton, associate chairman; C. A. Pugh, Miss Verdie Showalter, Mrs. D. H. Dofflemyer, R. O. Rothgeb, Vernon Whitacre, members at large; K. B. Dofflemyer, H. V. Harman, ex-officio members.
 - 3. That the solicitation of funds for this Campaign begin March, 1953.
- 4. That the Conference Campaign Committee allocate suggested quotas to the several churches, and with the Convention and National Committees promote the purpose of this Campaign to a successful conclusion.

Ordination and licensing of candidates as recommended by the Committee on the Ministry: Ordination of James W. Madren, Wakefield Parish (E. Va.), and licensure of Page Painter, now a senior studying at Elon College. Committee on the Ministry in charge.

The report of the Committee on Stewardship was read by Rev. E. J. Rohart, and was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP.

The principles of Christian Stewardship are as follows:

- 1. God is the owner of all things.
- 2. Man is a steward who handles something or has charge of something which belongs to God.
- 3. Man must give an account of his stewardship to God.

Stewardship is stern and sacred business. The Scriptures have a great deal to say about it. Perhaps one of the greatest surprises of Judgment Day will be the condemnation pronounced upon many people because they have been guilty of embezzlement, theft, dishonesty and negligence in regard to their stewardship of all that God has entrusted in their care.

We wish to recommend:

- 1. That each pastor encourage his members as faithful stewards to follow the Scriptural plan of giving as they are constrained by the love of Christ.
- 2. That the local churches use visual aids and literature in the teaching of stewardship.

3. That since our Southern Convention is employing a Stewardship and Evangelism Secretary that Stewardship Institutes be promoted in local churches.

4. That we encourage the Lord's Acre Plan and enroll members in our churches

to become conscientious tithers.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM.

The Southern Convention Committee on Evangelism and Devotional Life met in Henderson, N. C., September 23, 1952, to discuss plans and methods of Evangelism for the Convention. Dr. Roy C. Helfenstein, chairman, challenged the Committee to help re-kindle the evangelistic concern in the hearts of our people and on the altars of our churches.

In keeping with conclusions reached by the Convention Committee, each church in this Conference should:

1. Re-evangelize those already in the church.

- Make a religious survey of the community to discover the unchurched and inactive.
- 3. Help to re-establish those who move into the community.
- 4. Reach the careless and indifferent and win them to Christ.
- 5. Assimilate new members into the church fellowship.

We, therefore, recommend:

- 1. That this Conference, in cooperating with the Southern Convention Committee, approve a period of Evangelism, February 25, 1953, to Easter Sunday.
- 2. That each church and pastor have some special evangelistic emphasis during this period:

Suggested methods:

- a. Revival meetings.
- b. Visitation evangelism campaign.
- c. Christian decision week.
- d. Preaching missions.
- e. Pastor's class.
- 3. That each church emphasize and promote regular church attendance.
- 4. That we become better informed with the government and principles of our church, and thereby, inform others.
- 5. That five Conference Rallies be conducted by chosen teams in January, emphasizing Evangelism, namely: Winchester, Leaksville, Bethel, Linville and Bethlehem.

Your Committee on Religious Literature desires to place before you a few figures. We had reports from 11 churches representing 1,198 members—not quite half of the total membership, 2,484. There were 565 families represented in the 11 churches and

only 57 homes reported taking *The Christian Sun*. We sincerely hope the other nine churches can show a better record.

The members who read *The Christian Sun* have a better chance to know the interests of our church. In it are items of interest to parents and children, news from mission fields, Elon College, the Orphanage, and the Young People's work, plus a Sermon and the Sunday School Lesson.

We find the Sunday Schools use literature published by the International Uniform Gospel Press, Christian Education Press, Standard Publishing Co., David C. Cook and the Pilgrim Press.

We recommend use of Pilgrim Press Literature in all departments of our Sunday Schools.

Last, but not least, we recommend a revival of daily Bible reading.

The report of the Committee on Moral Reform was read by Rev. R. M. Galt, and was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE MORAL REFORM COMMITTEE.

The Moral Reform Committee apologizes for not serving the churches actively as a committee during the past Conference year.

The Chairman can report the following personal activities:

- 1. We went with other ministers and church leaders to an open meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Rockingham County and urged them not to listen to the beer sellers and not to relax the laws against selling beer on Sunday. They did as we requested.
- 2. We have begun efforts aimed at persuading all businesses to remain closed on Sunday morning until 12:30 P. M., and to hang cards on their doors advertising the churches. We seek the cooperation of all Christians, all churches, all chambers of commerce and individual businessmen, and local governments.

We recommend the following:

1. That all members of our churches stand uncompromisingly for and as good examples of temperance. At the same time we urge all to act so loving and full of the spirit of Jesus towards all their neighbors that we will not drive them to drink.

- 2. That all our churches help in the moves for no business on Sunday morning, and that our members stock up with goods on Saturday and not patronize business on Sunday. We do not condemn our members who feel forced to sell all day Sunday in order to make a living; but we urge them to help seek the simultaneous closing of their competitors and their own business.
- 3. That all church members remain faithful to, and uphold, the Christian moral standards of chastity and continence before marriage, and life-long faithfulness in marriage.

We urge the deacons and other leaders of our churches to visit families in their neighborhood which are in danger of becoming broken homes, and try to mediate and give a Christian witness to such families. We urge that our churches and ministers give pre-marital counseling to young people preparing for marriage.

The report on Education and the Standing of the Ministry was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION AND STANDING OF THE MINISTRY.

To say that we live in a world of unparalleled material advancement may be trite, but it is nevertheless true. So true, in fact, that it brings tingle to the blood when we think in terms of man's achievements in the modern world. The ancients had their "Seven Wonders" but they are puny in comparison with the wonders of man's progress in the world of today. This thing we call progress has invaded every area of man's life changing his patterns of though and action. Today, we have the miracle that is television, bringing to life in our own living rooms things that transpire a thousand miles away. Transportation, jet-propelled, which will be obsolete tomorrow, that annihilates time and space. The marvellous healing properties of the "miracle" drugs. A new agriculture, scientific and mechanized which has produced miracles in production. And what more shall we say? We live in the midst of a people of trained minds and skilled hands and to meet the spiritual needs of such a people we must have trained leaders who will command their intellectual respect. It is futile, perhaps fatuous, to think that the church is exempt from the march of progress, that its approach to life must ever remain unchanged. The minister who never reads a new book on some phase of his work, or who never finds some new techniques to make for a more effective ministry will find that life has passed him by. If this is a world of unparalleled material advancement it is also a day of unparalleled opportunity and challenge for the man of God to whom the ministry is a burning passion consuming the whole personality in unqualified loyalty and unquenchable zeal. Here is the call to modern youth! It is a call to high adventure! What greater vocation could there be than that of being the messenger of God's redeeming love to a world clever, but so conscious of the need of an inner peace which progress cannot give.

Your committee met during the sessions of the Southern Convention at Durham, and with the approval of the Executive Committee received into full membership the Reverend William L. Parker who presented satisfactory credentials from the North Carolina Missionary Convention of the Disciples of Christ. It received also, with the consent of the Executive Committee, the Reverend William A. Rich, who presented credentials from the North Carolina and Virginia Conference as having local ordination, and he was accorded the same standing in this Conference.

We make the following recommendations:

- 1. That John P. Littiken be continued as a member of the Biblical Class on transfer from the North Carolina and Virginia Conference. That Robert A. McLean be continued as a licentiate for another year.
- 2. That Carl J. Dixon be received as a candidate for the ministry with the understanding that he undertakes, and satisfactorily complete a prescribed course of study.
- 3. That the Reverend Raymond T. Grissom be granted a letter of transfer to the Western North Carolina Conference.

FIRST DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

Conference was called to order by the President.

Devotional Services were conducted by Rev. Geo. M. Tally.

Dr. W. T. Scott spoke on "Things to Come."

The report on Evangelism was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM.

The Church today is struggling in a world of fear and unrest. Paganism is growing in socalled Christian lands. In our own nation there has been a terrible lowering of moral standards.

The Church is the most powerful organization in the world today. It will not fail, though we may fail it. Christ has declared that the "gates of hell" shall not prevail against it.

The supreme task of the Church is evangelism. Jesus came into the world toseek and to save that which is lost. He is depending upon the Church to carry out His plan and purpose here in the world. One of the greatest needs of the Church is a reconsecration of its members and a rededication to this great cause. Too long we have failed to do our best. We have been at "ease in Zion." So few members have really been interested in the salvation of the lost or in the spiritual development of their own lives. Let us first of all pray for the oneness that will bring a pentecost and take seriously the words of Isaiah 52:1—"Awake, awake, put on thy strength, O Zion; put on thy beautiful garments, O Jerusalem." Then second, pray the Lord of the harvest, that He may send laborers into the field that is ripe unto harvest, and in helping to answer that prayer say, "Here am I, send me."

The Southern Convention "Committee on Evangelism and Devotional Life with the Chairman of each Conference Committee on Evangelism" met in Henderson, N. C., September 23, 1952, made and approved the following recommendations which we wish to present to you for your consideration and adoption:

- 1. That we have a special Evangelism Period throughout the Convention, beginning February 25, 1953, and running through Easter Sunday.
 - 2. That every church have some special evangelistic emphasis during this period as: a. Preaching mission.

 - b. Revival meeting.
 - c. A carefully worked out program of visitation evangelism.
 - d. Pastor's Class.
 - 3. That we emphasize church attendance.
 - 4 That we acquaint people with the Principles and Government of our church.

The report on Foreign Missions was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

If you will examine your year book for 1951, you will discover a startling and a significant thing. During that year, which is the last one of which we have any record, the people of the churches of the Eastern North Carolina Conference have contributed the total sum of \$128,526 for the work of the church. According to this same report, \$5,667.00—or four and one-half per cent—went to support our home and foreign missionary program combined. That means that, of every dollar given to the work of the church last year, only four and one-half cents went to help establish new churches and to carry the gospel to the uttermost parts of the earth.

Last year I heard a speaker say that the membership of the Congregational Christian Churches in North Carolina and Virginia was slowly declining and that many churches were either dead or slowly dying. Can this be the reason?

Jesus said, "He who seeks to have his life will lose it, but he who loses his life for my sake shall find it." I am in sympathy with the needs of our local churches, with our institutions, the college and the orphanage and they must have our support, but, unless we have the vision to look beyond ourselves and our own borders, we shall all come under the classification of unprofitable servants.

One of the evils of an apportionment system is the way church people will strive hard to pay their apportionment and then when it is paid, they will quit. They'll then sit back and take their ease, saying, like the Pharisee, "O God, we thank thee we are not as other churches. We're paid in full." And they'll get the Pharisee's reward.

I challenge you, every person here today, to go back to your local church determined next year to go the second mile. Call a meeting of your church, start a fire under your minister or your official board—and challenge them to get busy. The Evangelization of the World is the greatest job before us today. Four and a half per cent for others and ninety-five and a half per cent for ourselves isn't enough. Let's double or triple our giving for Missions next year.

The church I serve did that this past year and we've never had so much for ourselves. If only we had the faith to believe the words of Jesus, "Give and it will be given you," why we'd railse not \$5,000.00 but \$50,000.00. And in so doing, we'd not only save our own lives, but we'd no longer have to worry about dying churches and lukewarm Christians and not having enough for ourselves.

When you go back home, remember, the responsibility is entirely on your shoulders. If you don't do it, no one else will. And if your faith is weak, and if your church dies, and if, for lack of funds our Christian World Mission doesn't act fast enough to save us from another World War—well, you know where the blame lies.

But I believe that many of you, when you get back home, will do everything in your power to increase your giving to Missions for the year ahead. To you, I say, God bless you and help you and multiply your efforts a hundred fold.

The report on Stewardship was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP.

Our Lord said in Matthew 6:33, "But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and His righteousness: and all these things shall be added unto you."

We must put first things first. But without the new birth, no one can enter or even see the kingdom of God. John 3:3—"Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God."

This miracle of the new birth is a work of the Holy Spirit in the heart of the individual, when that one, by the grace of God through faith, receives Jesus Christ as their personal Saviour. John 1·12—"But as many as received him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on his name."

Therefore, we believe the first and most important work of the church today, is carrying the Gospel to those who are lost. "For . . . the Gospel of Christ is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth."

Christian stewardship is more than giving our money, it is the full consecration of ourselves to God. The first disciples forsook all and followed Jesus. After his conversion, Zacchaeus said that he was giving half his goods to the poor.

"Where there is no vision the people perish." We believe there is need in our Congregational Christian Churches for a new vision, that will bring a deeper consecration, of our time, our talents, and our material blessings to God. (1) We need, like Isaiah, to see the Lord high and lifted up. (2) We need to see our selves and our own need. (3) We need to see the millions at home and abroad, who have never yet been reached with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. And then say, with Isaiah, "Here am I Lord, send me."

We are glad to report that many of our churches are making progress. Some are adopting a budget for the first time this year, others have increased their giving by setting definite goals for the year. However, many of our churches and our conference still suffer temporal and spiritual poverty, because we have not given to God that which is His. We have sown sparingly, and are now reaping sparingly.

All who long to see the Lord's work financially unhampered will certainly agree. Proportional giving is Scriptural, business-like and effective.

We recommend:

- 1. That greater emphasis be placed on evangelism and stewardship.
- 2. That pastors declare the whole council of God which includes Christian stewardship.
- 3. That churches adopt some plan of finance, which will encourage regular and proportional tithing.

The report on Home Missions was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

Because of our direct contact with church extension activity, we often confine home missionary reporting to this limited phase of work. Realizing the interest in this area, we will place the burden of this report therein, but first let us look at our home mission work as a whole.

Home mission contributions include funds to the following work: The American Missionary Society; Christian Education; Church Extension and Evangelism; Ministerial Relief; The Pilgrim Press. We contribute to these five phases of home missions through the section of our regular apportionments marked "Home Missions." It is

imperative, and this committee emphatically recommends, that each church of this conference endeavors to do all that is reasonably possible to fulfill the minimum obligation as established by our apportionments. When a surplus of funds is realized by any of our stronger churches this committee suggests serious consideration be given to the plan of sending regular gifts to the Board of Home Missions. Certain phases of home mission work are limited only by the amount of funds available.

The depression of the thirties made an almost indelible stamp upon our churches in this area. A few of our urban churches have been able to erase these marks in part, but because of the fact that the overwhelming majority of our work is rural, we have responded very slowly as a conference. Lack of progress has been due mainly to a lack of leadership and a "depressionary" philosophy. Today our churches need not look backward. With modern transportation allowing rural church members to work in town and live near their home churches, a new day is dawning for the Eastern North Carolina Conference. With the increase economy of the average farmer in this section our rural churches have unlimited financial resources with which to build and crganize. There is truly a new day for us but certain bridges must be crossed. Closer grouping, new and better equipment and trained leadership are only a few of our needs at home if we are to blossom forth into a full grown conference for God. To meet our needs we must have financial support as a conference. We have failed, and are continuing to fail, because we have no substantial funds with which to support or subsidize men in the field until work can develop. Franklinton and Raleigh bespeak of fading opportunities because of a lack of funds. Many of our churches in the north and south Raleigh areas are only existing when they should be expanding because of a lack of service due mainly to a lack of funds. Have we an answer to these home mission problems?

This committee recommends the following considerations be given by our churches if our situation is to improve:

- 1. Complete cooperation with the Home Mission program and apportionments of our denomination.
- 2. Increased cooperation by individuals and groups in contributing to our Conference Missionary Association.
- 3. Unhesitant dispersion of funds by the C. M. A. for subsidizing pastors in our conference when better church grouping is the goal.
- 4. Complete cooperation with the "Church Building and Loan Fund Campaign" being launched this year by our church group.

Rev. Eric Braund spoke on the Church Building Loan Fund Campaign.

CHURCH BUILDING LOAN FUND CAMPAIGN.

In accordance with the action of the Executive Board of the Southern Convention in approving the Convention quota of \$135,000.00 in the Church Building Loan Fund Campaign of \$4,500,000.00 authorized by the General Council of Congregational Christian Churches, and in accordance with the recommendation of the Finance Committee of the Southern Convention that the Eastern North Carolina Conference accept a quota of \$17,690.00 in this campaign.

BE IT RESOLVED:

- 1. That the Conference accept the recommended quota,
- 2. That the Conference hereby designate as its campaign committee the following persons:

By motion the conference, by a rising vote, expressed thanks for the twenty years of service of the retiring Secretary.

Shallow Well was chosen, by vote, as the place of the 1953 session.

Conference adjourned to meet at 7:00 P. M., and was announced that the ladies will serve dinner in the Sunday school rooms.

Rev. R. L. Jackson pronounced the benediction.

TUESDAY—EVENING SESSION.

A film, "Basis of the Blueprint," showing the activity of the Church Building Society was given.

Rev. William A. Grissom conducted the devotional service and preached the Conference Sermon.

Rev. W. L. Wood and Rev. William A. Rich conducted the Communion Service assisted by Rev. J. Frank Apple, Dr. Will B. O'Neill, Rev. Kenneth M. Lindner and Rev. T. Fred Wright.

Benediction by Rev. William A. Rich.

WEDNESDAY-MORNING SESSION.

Conference was called to order by the President.

Devotional service was conducted by Rev. W. L. Parker.

Dr. John G. Truitt, Superintendent of the Christian Orphanage, was introduced and he spoke of the orphanage and its work.

Miss Bettie Burt Hight, President of the Conference Youth Fellowship, gave a report of the organization.

Miss Pattie Lee Coghill spoke of the Christian Education of the Southern Christian Convention.

In the absence of Dr. Robert Lee House, Miss Pattie Lee Coghill gave the report on Christian Education which reads as follows:

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

Christian Education is basic to our church growth and effectiveness. The Sunday School is a constant source of influence and training. To be as effective as we should with all age groups—from the youngest children to our oldest members—requires our best thinking, planning and efforts.

Your Committee wishes to commend the churches for their new Sunday school rooms and equipment expressing their concerning for Christian Education; and for the increased interest in the selection and use of good literature and other materials.

We realize the need in our Conference for more Leadership Training and recommend that individual churches and groups of churches work with the Convention Board of Christian Education, the Conference Sunday School Convention and the Committee on Christian Education in setting up Training Schools and classes.

We further recommend that the churches make a special effort to have young people attend the Conference Rallies, and the Summer Camps and Conferences for their inspiration, development and fellowship with other Christian young people.

Undergirding all of our work and indispensable through the years has been our Church College. We urge Elon College's support in the following ways:

- 1. By sending our church young people to Elon College.
- 2. By paying the annual college apportionment and sustaining fund.
- 3. By urging our church constituency to support the two and one-half million dollar campaign for the college, believing the success of the campaign will insure the needed expansion at the college at this time.

R. L. House, Chairman. By Pattie Lee Coghill.

The report on Religious Literature was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

Religious literature has been given a tremendous boost recently with the publication of the Revised Standard Version of the Bible. It was heralded via press, radio, television, pulpit and schools. Already some have assailed its content and form, but it is not the *one* and *only*, it is not to supplant the King James Version, but is prepared for us in our age. We heartily recommend its use in the pulpit and the home.

Public schools throughout the nation have been holding Book Fairs to which parents and teachers were invited to see the type of books being used and available for children in these days. They covered a wide range from first readers to handbooks on chemistry and early steps to nuclear studies. Perhaps the churches and church schools

should hold Book and Literature Fairs to show the people what we have. Do you know . . . ?

Friendship Press in New York offers a wide selection of religious, missionary and friendly service books. Let us emphasize again the value of using our own Sunday school literature. It is among the finest in our nation and is of a higher standard than some of the lesser known and cheaper publishing houses. Look at the cover—is it subdued and artistic, or loud and garish? Look at the contents . . . is it for children or religious drivel suited to child-like adults. Study available literature, if you don't like what we have to offer, then look over a wide range and pick the very best for your children. Some of them will know God and Christ the rest of their lives by what they read in your school next Sunday. Comics of the Sunday Pix type are very popular and make interesting reading for the comic-charmed middle-agers.

For our Convention *The Christian Sun* still remains our foremost piece of literature. It carries current accounts of local, state, convention and national happenings. Currently it is running an excellent series on the New Version. It is not accidental that churches with the best reports—financial and otherwise—are those that subscribe to and read *The Sun*.

Have you ever stood on the street corner and handed out religious literature? Probably not, but it is a good habit to cultivate. Take your church bulletin to a non-member. Give a friend a copy of *The Sun*. There is a wealth of free material. Ask your minister to tell you about it. Some of the fields covered are: churchmanship, evangelism, stewardship, devotional life, and race relations.

MRS. ROBERT LEE HOUSE, Chairman.

Rev. Morton R. Kurtz, Executive Director of the North Carolina Council of Churches was introduced and gave a report of the work of the Council.

Rev. Carl Key was introduced and he gave a preview of the Christian Rural Overseas Program.

The report of Committee on Memoirs was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS.

Deacon J. A. Kimball, a life-long member of Mt. Auburn Christian Church departed this life February 23, 1952, in his 85th year. Brother Kimball served his local church in many official capacities, and served for more than twenty years as a member of the Board of Trustees of Elon College.

BE IT RESOLVED that this session of Conference stand in tribute to this good man.

RICHARD L. JACKSON, W. T. SCOTT, Committee.

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By motion the report was adopted by rising with a moment of silence. The report on Superannuation was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUPERANNUATION.

The relief work among our retired ministers, ministers' widows and dependents is supported by the Board of Superannuation through our National Division of Home Missions, New York. Money contributed for Superannuation through the apportionment is paid by the churches direct to the Convention Office. The Convention remits all funds received to our New York office, and regular checks are mailed to our pensioners. We regret to say that our contributions to the Division of Ministerial Relief are considerably below the amounts which they in turn pay to our pensioners.

We urge our churches to pay in full the apportionment for Superannuation and exceed it if possible. We ask each church to see that their pastor is a member in the Annuity Fund. We also urge every church to receive a Special Christmas Offering for our aged ministers, the Veterans of the Cross. This offering constitutes a fund from which extra checks are sent to our retired ministers; also to cases of hardship or

sickness. Again, I must say, we are receiving more than we are giving, so we urge our people to support the Christmas Fund in addition to the regular apportionment.

By motion the report of the Executive Committee was recalled, and amended to read:

That the Conference Treasurer pay insurance premiums on all regularly called pastors who are members of this conference and serve churches within the bounds of the Southern Convention, and whose churches pay in full their Conference Fund.

Moved: That the Eastern North Carolina Conference approve and adopt the Amendments to the Principles and Government of the Southern Convention as adopted by the 1952 session of the Convention and that the Manual of the Convention continue to be the official handbook of the Eastern North Carolina Conference.

The Resolutions Committee reported as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

We, the Committee on Resolutions submit the following report:

- 1. That we express our gratitude to the pastor and the people of this church for their hospitality, cordial fellowship, abundant food and open homes provided for the pleasure of this Conference.
- 2. That we duly thank the President, Rev. Fred Register, officers and leaders for the careful preparation and hours of labor which have gone into this program for our pleasure and enlightenment.
- 3. That we express our sincere appreciation to the speakers on our program for their timely and inspiring messages.
- 4. That we express our deep and abiding sympathy to the family and friends of the late J. A. Kimball a life-long member of this church, a leader in this Conference, a trustee of Elon College in every sense a Christian gentleman. His loss from our fellowship will be keenly felt.
- 5. That we commend our worthy Secretary, Rev. E. M. Carter, for his diligence in the strenuous duties as secretary of this Conference for the past twenty years.
- 6. That we express our regrets of the absence of Dr. Robert Lee House who is recuperating from a recent illness and rejoice that his condition is greatly improving, and greetings be sent to him by the Secretary.
- 7. That the delegates to this conference be urged to make a thorough report of the actions of this session of Conference to their respective churches, and that the delegates and ministers make a conscientious effort to carry out the plans and suggestions made by this Conference for the coming year.

Moved and carried that the minutes of the Conference be published in The Annual and that we purchase 150 copies, to be distributed as before: one copy to each pastor, one to chairmen of committees and to the churches.

The report of the Finance Committee was presented as follows:

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE.

We, your Committee on Finance, have checked the records of the Treasurer and find them to be correct.

We recommend payment of \$50.00 to Rev. E. M. Carter for his services as Secretary, and that a contribution of \$50.00 be made to the North Carolina Council of Churches.

We also recommend payment of all expenses incurred by the officers in connection with their duties of the Conference, and other expenses incidental to this session of the Conference.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

We, the members of this Committee, make the following recommendations:

- 1. That Richard Cooke, a member of Berea (Great Bridge) Christian Church be admitted to the Biblical Class at Elon College.
- 2. That George Barron and Reuben Askew, Jr., be continued as members of the Biblical Class.
- 3. That Joseph Smith Bage be granted a certificate of licensure, his service of licensure to be held at a session of this Conference.
- 4. That Baxter Twiddy, Henry A. Gleason, Jr., Paul Varga and John G. Truitt, Jr., be continued as Licentiates of this Conference.
- 5. That the Conference Ordinations of Reverends John Gallo, M. E. Taylor and D. D. Nash be renewed for another year.
- .6. That Reverend William P. Vore, Virginia Chairman, and Dr. Jesse H. Dollar, Financial Advisor. Each spoke briefly concerning the campaign, after which Dr. Smith informed the Conference concerning the place, the achievements and the needs of Elon College.

The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

Christian Education embraces the whole program of the Church. We cannot take any one phase of the Church activities and say that this is the program of Christian Education. The total program of the Church should lend itself to the spiritual, moral and mental awakening of its people. To this end the program becomes both Christian and educational.

The demands of our day insist upon a very careful and intelligent appraisal of the moral, spiritual and mental ability of those who are placed in positions of responsibility in our churches. Our churches are more aware of this fact today than ever before. This is evidenced by more and better facilities for training and teaching in the local churches. If we are to hold our place in the world we must continue to lay stress on and make progress in Christian Education.

The Sunday School and Vacation Bible School go hand in hand in the program of training. Almost all of our churches reported successful Bible Schools and growth in the Sunday Schools. Summer Camps were held at Bayside for Juniors and at Elon for Young People and these were well attended and reported successful programs. Leadership Training Schools were held in the Conference, some on the initiative of local churches.

It is hoped that the coming year will bring even greater determination in advancing the program of Christian Education, directing our thinking and our planning in the following basic channels:

- Bigger and better Sunday Schools in every church, giving careful thought to the materials used.
- 2. A Vacation Bible School in every church.
- 3. Leadership Training Schools are essential in acquainting with new materials and methods those who lead in our churches. We call upon our Convention Board of Christian Education not only for assistance but for active leadership in promoting and scheduling training schools.
- 4. More support and greater loyalty to Elon College. We all have a vital stake in higher education as expressed at Elon College. Elon College is our opportunity to uphold and support our great heritage of Christian Education on the higher level. Our College deserves our support, needs our support, welcomes our support. Elon College is our foremost investment in Christian Education.

The Board of Christian Education of our Convention is ready to assist all churches just for the asking, and would welcome an opportunity to serve you.

The report of the Committee on Stewardship was presented and, pending its adoption, Dr. W. Millard Stevens, President of the Southern Convention, addressed the Conference on the subject, "Our Stewardship to the Southern Convention."

The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP.

Christian Stewardship is not designed primarily to finance the Church. Its primary function is to help people live full Christian lives. In accomplishing this, Christian Stewardship makes the Church alive and vital, so that sound financial practices are a natural part of the local church, because they are a natural part of the life of the individual church member. We have made rapid strides in our Eastern Vigrinia churches in the matter of Christian Stewardship. We predict that this progress will continue.

Stewardship education is a constant part of the life of every vital church. It manifests itself in Church School classes, group meetings, individual relationships, preaching, worship, and the manner in which the offering is handled in all worship services. Our stewardship education will be either good or bad in all these activities. We should strive always to make it good.

Much valuable material on Christian Stewardship is available from the Missions Council, from the Department of Stewardship of the National Council of Churches, and from many other sources. We urge our churches to use this material. Some of our churches develop material locally for their own use, such as mimeographed or printed pamphlets, slides about the church program, illustrated budgets, etc. We recommend this practice to all our churches.

Stewardship is a vital necessity in Christian living. We must not fail to practice it. Many wonderful resources are available to us and many more are being produced

each year. Let us use them.

The report of the Eastern Virginia Christian Missionary Association was presented and, pending its adoption, Dr. W. M. Stevens, Dr. I. W. Johnson and Rev. H. E. Crutchfield, President of the Christian Missionary Association, spoke of the work of the organization and of the need for additional support from the churches that advantage may be taken of the opportunities for church extension.

The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF CHRISTIAN MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION.

The sixtieth annual session of the Eastern Virginia Christian Missionary Association convened at the Liberty Spring Christian Church, December 4, 1951. The president, Rev. W. Stanley Carne, called the session to order. The worship service was conducted by Dr. I. W. Johnson.

The financial secretary, Rev. R. E. Brittle, called the roll of the churches and collected dues which amounted to \$3,245.00. The recording secretary received \$110.00 the following day which made a total of \$3,355.00.

Reports were made by Rev. M. E. Taylor, pastor of Little Creek; Rev. Melvin Dollar told of the work at Union (South.); Rev. J. Everette Neese told of the work at Second Church, Norfolk; Mr. S. T. Holland reported on Windsor; and Mrs. I. S. Morris and Rev. Johnson L. Griffin told of the progress at Bay View.

The report of finance showed a total of \$7,854.21.

The Committee on Plans made seven pertinent recommendations:

- 1. To Hopewell Church on pastor's salary at the rate of \$25.00 per month, \$300.00.
- 2. To Sunbury to complete payment on parsonage, to be paid at once, \$400.00.

- 3. To Little Creek on pastor's salary at the rate of \$50.00 per month, \$600.00.
- 4. To Bay View on pastor's salary, payable at \$33.33 per month, \$400.00.
- 5. To Second Church, Norfolk, to be used to meet first year's payments on parsonage, to be paid to the financing agency when arrangements for purchase are made, subject to approval of the president of the C. M. A., \$1,2000.00.
- That \$750.00 of the funds remaining in the treasury be earmarked for a future new church.
- 7. That in view of the fact Bay View Church now has its plans for its building and expects to begin construction at an early date, that \$3,000.00 earmarked for this project and the \$1,250.00 contributed by the Congregational Christian Temple remain available for Bay View when the building is under construction, with the provision that unless the building is underway by June 1, 1952, that the money revert to the general funds of the C. M. A. and be available for reallocation, and that the Congregational Christian Temple be requested to reallocate the \$1,250.00 held for it by the C. M. A. to another project.

Since the sixtieth session the Little Creek Church voted to assume full responsibility of their pastor's salary leaving the \$600.00 allocated to them in the treasury. Second Church has called for and received \$1,200.00 allocated to them on the parsonage. The Bay View Church called for the \$4,250.00 held for them to be applied to their Educational Building as it was under construction.

of Evangelism and Stewardship which is included in the Convention Fund. The cost of office and administration of the Mission Funds has been added to the Convention Fund, where is properly belongs, and in the future all funds contributed for missions will go to missions. There is also a slight increase in Per Capita Dues for support of the General Council.

You will note that there are two items in the new schedule for Home Missions and one for Foreign Missions. Convention Home Missions and Church Extension will represent funds for Home Missions within the Convention for new churches, aid to weak churches, building aid, etc. National Home Missions and Ministerial Relief will represent funds we will send to our National Board of Home Missions for Home Missions work throughout the denomination and for aid to retired pastors, pastors' widows and dependents. You will see that our former "Superannuation Fund" is combined with National Home Missions and that the National Board of Home Missions now will handle that aid.

The Convention authorized the Elon College Sustaining Fund for the biennium, the Christian Orphanage to seek an additional \$25,000.00 per year as a "Special", and annual "Specials" of \$25,000.00 and \$7,500.00 for Home Missions and Foreign Missions respectively. The share of this Conference of these amounts is not reflected in the apportionment table.

We strongly recommend that your church approve Paragraph No. 12 of the report of the Convention Finance Committee, which reads as follows: "During the past biennium several churches have followed the practice of sending contributions to the Convention Office with the request that they be distributed proportionately to all apportionment items. We commend these churches in this practice and recommend it to all the churches of the Convention for their favorable consideration." This recommendation has two main practical points in its favor: (1) Salaries not only of the Convention Staff but also of our Home Mission pastors and missionaries must be paid on a monthly basis throughout the year. (2) Some of the apportionment items are more attractive to givers than others. Such a practice would mean that each item in the apportionment would receive a fair share of the support of each church.

The report of the Committee on Superannuation was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUPERANNUATION.

Fourteen years ago, the writer of this report became chairman of the Conference Committee on Superannuation. At that time there was being raised about \$600.00 a year for the aged ministers of our Convention and the widows of deceased ministers by this conference. The work of the Convention was not in any way identified with the work of the General Council, and there were few if any of our ministers who were members of the Annuity Fund. Last year this conference raised over \$1,400.00 for Superannuation, which did not include the Christmas Fund offerings, these amounting to some \$300.00 extra. Practically all of our ministers were members of the Annuity Fund, and at the last session an insurance program was put into effect which serves to give additional protection to the ministers who so faithfully serve us. We have made at least some progress up the scale, though there is much more that can be accomplished.

At our last session of The Southern Convention, action was taken bringing the convention program further in line with that of the General Council. The Board of Superannuation was discontinued as such, and the duties of that board were incorporated into the work of the Convention Mission Board.

We believe that the conference should follow the pattern laid down by the Council and the Convention, therefore, we recommend:

- 1. That the churches make sure that their apportionment for the help of our aged ministers and the widows of those deceased, be raised in full.
- 2. That the Christmas Fund offerings be taken at that season as an extra or free will offering.
- 3. That if there are any ministers in our conference who are eligible, but who do not belong to the Annuity Fund, that they and their churches cooperate to see that they become members at the earliest possible time.
- 4. That in keeping with the action of the Southern Convention, that this committee be discontinued and that the work of the committee be turned over to the Committee on Home Missions.

The report of the Commmittee on Religious Literature was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

The Committee on Religious Literature, though somewhat of perfunctory significance by reason of serving only in an advisory capacity, nevertheless represents one of the most important interests of the Conference. The reading habits of the pastors—what they read and the importance they attach to systematic and discriminating reading is always reflected in their preaching and in their general attitude toward their work and toward life itself. Moreover, the reading habits of a pastor are definitely reflected in the work and progress of the church he serves. Creative thinking is always conditioned upon systematic and insatiate reading. Knowing what others think, stimulates a reader's own thinking and helps one more wisely to evaluate the various truths and positions presented by writers.

Your Committee on Religious Literature believes that a reading ministry makes for reading congregations and for a well-informed laity. To this end we would heart-ily recommend that our ministers read as widely as possible, not confining their reading to any one phase of religious interest or to any one type of religious authors, and especially not to exclude from the list of books they read books that present a point of view contradictory to their personal views.

We would recommend and urge that during the new conference year every pastor read at least one new book each quarter—preferably one new book each month. There are many pastors who make it a practice to read one new book each week, but such a schedule does not leave necessary time for meeting the responsibilities of a parish; neither does such a schedule leave sufficient time for a person to assimilate what he reads, and in some instances might cause the reader to degenerate into "A Book Worm."

However, if it is true, as is frequently contended, that some pastors are guilty of not reading a single new book in an entire year, it would be fitting to ask God's mercy upon them and upon their congregations. And your Committee on Religious Literature strongly believes that for every minister in our Conference to read at least one new book each quarter, preferably one new book each month, in the coming year would make a distinct contribution to the advancement of the churches they serve and to the work of our Conference.

The historian of the Conference, Dr. N. G. Newman, informed the Conference concerning interesting and amusing items of information he had discovered in preparing the histories of several of the churches of the Conference.

Attention was called to the fact that Dr. Newman was observing the sixty-first anniversary of his ordination. He was ordained on October 29, 1891.

The report of the Committee on Evangelism was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM.

We believe it is the function of every member of the church to be an active evangelist, his personal motive being as follows:

"I believe Jesus lived and died for me and all mankind, a free gift from God. that I and every person might have life here and now throughout all eternity. In loving recognition of this gift from God to me, I am impelled to bear my witness of that love and gift, by word, deed and life. By cooperative action with my brethren who likewise recognize God's love and His supreme gift, I shall with them seek to find and use the best possible methods to bring others to an acceptance and recognition of this love and gift."

With the above motive in mind, and in cooperation with the Convention program, your committee recommends the following:

- 1. That we have a *special* program throughout the convention from February 18, 1953, through Easter Sunday, April 5th. Suggested special evangelistic emphasis during this period may be:
 - a. Preaching mission or revival meeting.
 - b. Carefully worked out visitation evangelistic campaign.
 - c. Pastor's class.
 - d. Fellowship evangelism.
- 2. That we emphasize church attendance, especially appropriate before World-Wide Communion and during the Lenten Season.
 - 3. Acquaint our people with the principles and government of our churches.
 - 4. Re-evangelize those already in the church.
- 5. Re-evangelize those moving into the community who have lost contact and need to be re-established. We suggest a careful survey to discover all prospects.

- 6. Assimilate new members—giving every member a place of responsible service in line with his particular talent, such as:
 - a. Teacher.
 - b. Choir member.
 - c. Church officer.
 - d. Sunday school work.
 - e. Missionary work.
 - 7. That conference rallies be conducted by teams emphasizing evangelism.
- 8. Publish special articles in *The Christian Sun* on evangelism during the evangelistic period.
- 9. That the churches report the results of the special evangelism program to the Committee on Evangelism.

The report of the Committee on Foreign Missions was presented and, pending its adoption, Dr. James M. Hess, formerly missionary to Madhurai, South India, now at Elon College, addressed the Conference.

The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The task of mission education is one of the most important that the church faces. Particularly is this true of our foreign mission effort. In the field of Home Missions we are able to see the work that is being done, but our eyes fail to focus on the tremendous tasks that are being effectively carried out in Africa, the Near East, the Philippines, Mexico and the Pacific Islands. Since our knowledge is limited our interest slows down—and as our interest lags our concern tends to lose its force both in prayer and in giving.

The women of our Southern Convention have done a good work in mission education. Unfortunately much of that education has had no carryover into the general church. Missions remains a mystery to our men and to our youth. It is time for us

to offer mission education to our whole church family.

Our women of the Southern Convention have taken the salary responsibility for Miss Corinne Nordquest at the station in Johannesburg, South Africa; Miss Harriet Summerville is the personal Christian representative of every member of the Reidsville Church; Mr. and Mrs. Carl Dille are known by few in our Southern Convention and Miss Mary Hurlburt is another who represents us—all of these are in Africa. Our work there is personal if we take the trouble to make it so. We can become personally acquainted with our mission work throughout the world if we will take the time and trouble to use materials that are available to us through the American Board and the Department of Visual Aids. This committee will be happy to supply you with a full list of those materials.

Each of our churches should make the most of the firsthand report that Dr. W. W. Sloan can give since he visited Africa and the Near East this summer. He will be glad to share his experiences of the work in Africa and he has the ability to make the whole picture come alive.

Without an adequate mission emphasis our churches tend to wither and lose power. Let each of us assume a personal responsibility for missionary education in the year

that lies ahead.

Newman address the Conference at the Thursday Morning Session.

The report of the Committee on Home Missions was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

In taking inventory of the work done in the Conference for the last few years, it is very noticeable the great amount of building done and improvements made in physical equipment. Several congregations have either built new churches or enlarged or added to what they already had. Others need to and are planning to build. Many of our people have come to the realization that while we as individuals or families live in comfortable and goodly houses that it is not right that we should let the "ark of the covenant" be sheltered by an unsightly roof. Our children in public school and other places enjoy some of thte best which can be offered. Surely the Church of the Living God should be dissatisfied to offer anything less. Several churches have built parsonages and have full time pastors. Your committee feels that each church or group of churches should have a parsonage that would be a credit to the church.

We believe that one of our greatest undeveloped resources is a genuine church pride. A pride which begets a deeper appreciation of the local church to which we belong, to be sure, but a pride which is so rich that it reaches out through and beyond the local church to develop a love for and loyalty to our denomination and all of its children, such as Elon College, The Christian Orphanage, The Christian Sun and several others. Unless our pride reflects itself in loyalty to all of these we have fallen short.

Your committee feels that in the light of such a greatly increased population, and newly and rapidly developing housing units, we should have some newly organized churches in keeping with our great possibilities. We commend to all the churches and members of local churches of our conference the great work, goals and purposes of the Christian Missionary Association as one of the strong forces for home missionary work in our Conference.

Unusual, as it may seem, your Home Missions Committee has received only one request for help from the Home Missions Fund of the Conference. We hope that this is indicative of the fact that more churches are endeavoring to depend solely on themselves in the face of pictured needs of beginning new work in Eastern Virginia.

We recommend the payment of \$400.00 to be applied on the parsonage payments for the coming year to Second Church, Norfolk, Virginia.

The afternoon session adjourned after the benediction by Dr. N. G. Newman.

WEDNESDAY—EVENING SESSION.

Conference was called to order at 7:30 P. M. by President Jesse H. Dollar.

The worship service was conducted by Rev. O. D. Poythress, pastor of the South Norfolk Congregational Christian Church, assisted by the choirs of the church.

A service of Licensure was held for Joseph S. Bage. The service was conducted by Dr. H. S. Hardcastle. Dr. I. W. Johnson, Dr. N. G. Newman and Rev. J. E. McCauley participated in the service.

The Conference Sermon, "The Light of the World," was delivered by Dr. D. J. Bowden, Dean of Elon College.

The service of Holy Communion was conducted by Dr. Duane N. Vore and Rev. A. Lanson Granger, Jr., assisted by the Deacons of the South Norfolk Congregational Christian Church.

THURSDAY—MORNING SESSION.

Conference was called to order at 9:30 A. M. by Vice-President Duane N. Vore. Rev. T. W. Britton led the opening hymn and Rev. R. E. Tally led the prayer for guidance.

The report of the Eastern Virginia Laymen's Fellowship was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF EASTERN VIRGINIA LAYMEN'S FELLOWSHIP.

The Laymen's Fellowship of the Eastern Virginia Conference has had a fairly successful year.

The Fall Rally, held at the Congregational Christian Temple, Norfolk, Va., was very well attended. Retiring President Mills E. Godwin, Jr., had arranged for a very good program. Interesting, inspiring, instructive and challenging talks were given by J. Vaughan Beale, Loren P. Waldo, Jr., Donald Schriver and Rev. James H. Lightbourne, Jr. The singing, food and fellowship were enjoyed by all. The wholesome group participation was gratifying.

On February 19th the Executive Committee met in the pastor's study of the Suffolk Christian Church for the purpose of making plans for 1952. Rev. D. N. Vore and Past President Mills E. Godwin, Jr., met with the committee and rendered valuable and much appreciated assistance.

It was decided—for this year at least—that two meetings of the Fellowship would be tried—one in the late spring and one in the fall. The spring meeting was to be one of inspiration, fun and fellowship. The fall meeting was to be one of the workshop type.

The Spring Rally was held at the Planter's Club, Driver, Va., on May 8, Rural Life Sunday, 3:30 to 8:30 P. M. The afternoon was given over to out-door recreational games. In the evening came a dinner meeting during which delicious food, superb singing, and an excellent address by Rev Thomas B. Keehn, Secretary of the Department of Christian Citizenship, Council for Social Action of the Congregational Christian Churches, were enjoyed. The weather was not too favorable but around 150 men were in attendance.

From reports it seems that much fine work has been done by the laymen in many of our churches during the year. But much yet needs to be done. A better organization of the laymen for more cooperative action seems imperative. The apparent indifference or lack of interest of some churches and/or their pastors is a source of regret and surprise. The success of the Laymen's Fellowship program is every churchman's responsibility. In this chaotic world the opportunity and challenge that loomed large on yesterday are today standing boldly in view. Everyone knows that we can if we will—make progress. But we need much more those who will honestly say, "We will do what we can."

Laymen's Sunday, October 19, was observed by many of our churches. Well attended and worthwhile programs were given. This annual observation is one way of enhancing the laymen's program. It is hoped that in the years to come every church will fitly observe this Sunday.

At the Newport News Christian Church—on November 16, 1952—our fall workshop type meeting will be held. It is hoped that *every* church in thte conference will be well represented. "Out of this world" food has been assured! Be there!

The report of the Eastern Virginia Woman's Missionary Conference was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE EASTERN VIRGINIA WOMAN'S MISSIONARY CONFERENCE.

The fortieth annual session of the Woman's Missionary Conference of the Eastern Virginia Congregational Christian Churches met on October 2, 1952 at 10:00 in the Congregational Christian Temple, Norfolk, with an attendance of about three hundred and fifty.

The theme for the day was: "Building—With Love and Gratitude." The service of devotion was led by Mrs. J. F. Morgan, using as her topic, "The House We Are Building." Information from the district superintendents and departmental leaders indicated well-made plans for the year had been faithfully executed. Miss Pattie Lee Coghill presented the literature for the year. Mrs. W. B. Williams, president of the Woman's Missionary Convention, addressed the conference on "Together We Build." The treasurer reported \$9,199.88 which included \$650.00 for Life Membership and Memorial Certificates to be used for Franklinton Center. The 1952 Thank Offering will go for the Carroll County, Virginia, project. We had as our speakers for the conference Dr. W. W. loan, who has recently returned from Africa; Dr. W. T. Scott and Rev. James Madren, who spoke on the projected program in Carroll County. Dr. L. E. Smith, president of Elon College, presented and spoke on the current campaign by Elon College. Dr. John G. Truitt, Superintendent of the Orphanage, thanked the women for coupons and requested more for the orphanage. Mrs. W. B. Williams told of the campaign by the Church Building Society which will be launched in March, 1953.

The following recommendations were adopted:

- 1. That \$50.00 be appropriated to the Virginia Council of Churches.
- 2. That the goal for the Eastern Virginia Woman's Missionary Conference for 1952-53 be set for \$9,000.00.
 - 3. That special emphasis be placed on the work in the Carroll County Mission.
 - 4. That each local society endeavor to show the feature film, "More for Peace."

The reports were mimeographed in booklets and distributed, making possible a longer usefulness.

The officers for the year 1952-53 were installed by Mrs. R. T. Bradford as follows: Mrs. Garland Spratley, President; Mrs. Ray Gordon, Vice-President and Chairman of Friendly Service; Mrs. H. S. Hardcastle, Recording Secretary; Mrs. L. W. Stagg, Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. George Cornell, Treasurer.

The following Superintendents were elected: Mrs. John F. Williams, Young People; Mrs. S. T. Holland, Children; Mrs. R. F. Edwards, Cradle Roll.

Rev. Ellis N. Clark spoke concerning the work of the Virginia Church Temperance Council.

On motion it was voted that a contribution of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) from the Conference Fund be made to the Virginia Church Temperance Council.

The report of the Eastern Virginia Sunday School Convention was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

The Eighty-third annual session of the Sunday School Convention of Eastern Virginia Congregational Christian Churches was held at the Bethlehem Christian Church, Nansemond County, July 2, 1952. The session was well attended and exceedingly helpful.

The program of the day included an address by Dr. Stanley C. Harrell, pastor of the Congregational Christian Church of Durham, North Carolina, and group meetings. Dr. Harrell brought more meaning to the cardinal principles of our church and challenged the Convention to a greater consecration to the work of the church. His subject was: "What We Christians Believe." A full hour was devoted to group meetings. The Children's Division, Young People, Adults and Superintendents, each of the four had problems and plans confronting them specifically presented and discussed. This part of the program also proved to be most interesting and beneficial. A large number of those present participated.

The total receipts of the Convention amounted to \$970.00. There were 39 of the 43 churches in the Conference reporting. Of this amount \$750.00 was to be sent to the Board of Christian Education; \$50.00 to the Virginia Council of Churches; \$100.00 for Leadership Training Schools in Eastern Virginia Conference and \$70.00 for the expenses of the secretary of the convention.

Officers elected for the coming year were: J. Letcher Eley, President; Rev. H. E. Crutchfield, Vice-President; W. H. Baker, Secretary; Miss Mary Lee Folk, Treasurer.

The Convention will hold its 1953 session with the Oakland Christian Church on Tuesday after the third Sunday in July.

FLOYD A. TURNER, President.

Mr. W. K. Newman, Secretary of the Board of Home Missions, addressed the Conference on the subject of "Church Extension." Attention was called to the number of new churches helped and the work those churches now are accomplishing. The Conference was advised that there are many fine opportunities of real concern for church extension.

A resolution calling upon the Eastern Virginia Conference to support and participate in the Church Building Loan Fund Campaign was introduced.

On motion it was voted that the resolution be approved and made a part of the report of the Committee on Resolutions. (The resolution in full is appended to the report of the Committee on Resolutions).

The report of the Committee on Social Action was presented and, pending its adoption, Rev. C. Emerson Smith, Assistant Executive Secretary of the Virginia Council of Churches, addressed the Conference concerning the work of the Council of Churches among the migrant workers in Virginia.

The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL ACTION.

During the past year the chairman of the committee mimeographed and sent copies to all the ministers of the statement of Christian faith and race relations prepared by the National Council of Churches, and asked that it be read in all the churches on Race Relations Sunday in February. The chairman gave assistance to the Eastren Virginia Laymen's Fellowship in securing Rev. Thomas B. Koehn, Director of Christian Citizenship, the Council of Social Action of our Congregational Christian Churches, as speaker at the meeting of the Laymen's Fellowship in May. We take pleasure in the

appearance on our conference program today of the Rev. C. Emerson Smith, associate executive secretary of the Virginia Council of Churches.

Your Committee offers the following recommendations:

- 1. We recommend that a greater effort be made in our churches to interpret the work of the Council for Social Action. Our churches are fairly well acquainted with the important activities of the American Board of Foreign Missions and the Board of Home Missions of our denomination, but less well acquainted with the functions of the Council for Social Action and the work it is doing, as through its departments of Christian Citizenship of Agricultural, Industrial, International and Race Relations it endeavors to bring to bear the witness of the Christian faith upon these many facets of our common life. In particular we would urge the study of the pamphlet, "The Stewardship of the Council for Social Action," by ministers and lay leaders, and that interpretation be given the work of the C. S. A. This could be done in meetings of the Official Board, Men's Organizations, Women's Organizations, etc.
- 2. We urge that in each of our churches there be subscriptions to "Social Action," the magazine of the C. S. A.
- 3. We recommend that we begin in the Sunday school with a program of teaching against intolerance, and explain Jesus' teaching about human brotherhood.
- 4. We recommend, following the vote of the Southern Convention at its meeting in Durham April 29-May 1, that this conference invite fraternal delegates of the Virginia Congregational Christian Conference to attend the sessions of our conference, and that we keep the door open for constant and friendly counsel on a Christian basis.

On motion it was voted that the Finance Committee be instructed to present to the Conference recommendations concerning an increase in appropriations for the Virginia Council of Churches.

Dr. John G. Truitt, Superintendent of the Christian Orphanage, reviewed the work of the year at the institution and urged that the churches be as liberal as possible in the annual Thanksgiving Offering for the Orphanage.

The report of the Eastern Virginia Youth Fellowship was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF YOUTH FELLOWSHIP.

One year ended and another year started on that October day in 1951, at Suffolk. All were quite pleased with the number of young people gathered for our Fall Missionary Rally. We had quite a nice surprise—Jose Debuet was with us for the meeting. The young people had chosen for the coming year's Foreign Mission Project the support of Jose for one year of study at Princeton University. Jose came to us from the Philippines where he is a minister in the Interdenominational Church of the Philippines.

In drawing up our budget we as young people realized we should do our part in the building of our churches in Eastern Virginia. The more one gives to God's work the richer his life will become. This our young people know from sharing in our Foreign and Home Missions.

Our second State Rally in Richmond did much to help unite our Christian work in Virginia. Our speaker, Miss Oline Nicholson, brought us a challenge—there is work for us to do in other countries, especially in India.

We joined the other conferences in the Southern Convention to send Philip Mann, the President of the Southern Convention Youth Fellowship, to California to attend the National Council of Pilgrim Fellowship and the General Council of Congregational Christian Churches.

As the year ended plans had been made to have a newspaper for our Eastern Youth Fellowship. With this newspaper and plans in the making, we hape that the coming year will be even more inspiring and enriching than the past year.

We greatly appreciate the interest and the help of the ministers of the Conference. We hope they will continue to feel free to help our Youth Fellowship at all times.

We would like to pay tributte to our greatest help and backbone for the past years. Even though she is no longer to be our superintendent, we hope that she has not retired from young people's work. Many thanks go to Mrs. R. E. Brittle for her untiring patience and inspiring help.

4. That the Conference Campaign Committee allocate quotas to the several churches of the Conference, and with the Convention and National Campaign Committees promote the Campaign to a successful conclusion.

IN MEMORIAM

During the past year one death has occurred among the ministers and officials of the Conference. On April 1, 1952, after a brief illness, Rev. William Stanley Carne, pastor of the First Church, Portsmouth and Mt. Zion Church of Eclipse, passed away. He was 68 years old. He served several important charges during his long ministry, including Spokane, Seattle, and Leavenworth, Washington, five years; Gorham, Maine, thirteen years; Moody Church, Northfield, Mass., nine years; Elizabethtown, N. Y., six years; and First Church Portsmouth and Mt. Zion, Eclipse, Va., nearly five years. The importance of these charges and the success of his work indicated his adaptability and versatility as a pastor and preacher of the Word.

He was a man of God. His humility and dignity, his cheerfulness and sound thinking, his sincerity and integrity, his standards of conduct and character, his loyalty and spiritual devotion—all these impressed his friends and made his ministry useful and uplifting to the churches. In the pulpit and out of it, his manner of life witnessed to a deep consecration and high spiritual living.

The Convention—Dr. W. T. Scott, Superintendent of the Southern Convention. Questions were asked and discussed concerning ministers' insurance.

Our Orphanage—Dr. John G. Truitt, Superintendent of the Orphanage.

Our College—Dr. L. E. Smith, President of Elon College. Dr. Smith asked Dr. F. C. Lester and Dr. W. T. Scott to tell what Elon College had meant to them.

Report on the Ministry by Rev. E. Carl Brady, chairman, was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINISTRY.

- Rev. Winfred Bray, a minister with local licensure, has met the requirements for regular licensure. We recommend that he be recognized as a regular licentiate.
- Avery Brown, a member of the Biblical Class and of our Antioch Church, has followed a prescribed course of study during the year. We recommend local licensure for him.
- 3. Gene Thomas, a member of the E. and R. Church and a sophomore at Elon, appeared before the committee. We recommend that he be admitted to the Biblical Class pending his uniting with some church of our denomination and upon recommendation of said church.
- 4. Lunnie Burgess is the pastor of Center Grove Church. He has been there each Sunday during the year. We recommend local ordination for him.
- 5. Max Vestal, a senior at Elon and pastor of Pleasant Ridge, and Spoons Chapel, appeared before the committee. We recommend regular ordination for him upon completion of his college course. This ordination service to be held at such time and place as may be acceptable to both Max and the president of conference.
- 6. We recommend that Bill Simmons be continued as a licentiate.
- 7. John Bowers, pastor of Smithwood appeared before the committee. We recommend local ordination for brother Bowers at this session of conference.

- Rosser Lee Clapp, pastor of the group entertaining this session of conference, has
 finished his work at Elon College. We recommend his ordination at this session
 of conference.
- Martin L. Fogleman, a local minister, wishes to be continued in his present status, we so recommend.
- 10. We recommend that Gail Brady be continued as a member of the Biblical Class.
- 11. Douglas Harper, a member of the Albemarle Church, is in the local high school completing his education. We recommend his admission to the Biblical Class.
- 12. Revs. T. D. Sutton and W. T. Madren are transferring their field of labor to the North Carolina and Virginia Conference and desire letters of transfer to said conference. We recommend that the secretary issue their letters forthwith.
- 13. Rev. R. T. Grissom wishes to transfer his membership to this conference from the Eastern North Carolina Conference. We recommend that he be received pending his letter of transfer from that conference.

Mrs. Dorothy Jackson was introduced by Dr. Lester. She spoke on the subject, "I Was Your Missionary in China," and showed several articles Chinese use.

Mr. M. T. Garren was introduced and spoke on "A Problem of the Denomination." He represented the Building Society of the General Council. Mr. Garren then introduced Rev. Eric T. Braund of Greenbelt, Maryland. He also spoke on the needs of the Building Society and the campaign for funds.

After a moment of quiet meditation, Rev. Lunnie Burgess pronounced the benediction.

WEDNESDAY—EVENING SESSION.

Called to order by the president.

Hymn.

Worship service led by Rev. Rosser Lee Clapp, host pastor. Mr. Clemm Shankle gave a poem entitled "Faith." The service closed with a solo by Miss Helen Farlow, "I Am Satisfied With Jesus."

The report on Women's Work was presented by Mrs. Bill Simmons, new District Superintendent of the Asheboro District. Mrs. Burroughs was unable to be present because of illness. The report was adopted as follows:

WOMEN'S WORK.

Mrs. Clyde Fields served as superintendent of the Asheboro District until she moved away last summer. I have served since then, and now Mrs. Bill Simmons is the new superintendent of women's work in this area.

Our greatest concern is the fact that only 15 of the 38 churches in this conference have an organized women's society which cooperates with our denomination. We feel that no church is fulfilling its complete ministry if it does not have such a group. Your superintendent will be happy to meet with any group desiring help in organizing a women's society, or information about organizing one. Call on her.

We also need to have more women from this area attending our three meetings during the year: the School of Missions at Elon College in the summer, which gives

us help for our whole year's work; the fall conference, which will be held next year at our new church in Greensboro; and the spring rally, which will be held in March at Union Grove. Representatives will be welcome even though you do not have an active women's society—come and learn about the work, then go home and work at organizing in your church.

This year we are to study about human rights in the home mission field, Africa for our foreign mission theme, and the Epistle to the Colossians for our Bible study. Our Thank Offering is to go to our home mission work in Carroll County, Virginia, where Rocky Ford is planning to relocate its building.

This is the first time in 22 years that I have not attended Conference. You may be sure that the meeting at Seagrove is in my thoughts and prayers.

Laymen's Fellowship report was presented by Sybrant Pell, and adopted as follows:

LAYMEN'S FELLOWSHIP.

In the holy Scripture we find these words in Psalm 133: "Behold how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity." We have proven this Scripture in our meetings this year. It has been good and very pleasant for us in our meetings. It has been inspiring to see so many men from all ways of life take time out from their daily tasks to come together for our rallies for worship, fellowship, food and fun.

Our plans are to hold four rallies each year, and three have been held this year. At these meetings the attendance has been a total of 257, or an average of 87. We appreciate the interest the ministers have shown by their coming. So far our meetings have been to rally the interests of our men. Now we really expect to go to work on a program that will show results in our church of the future. On November 29 we are to have a Father and Son Banquet. We want you fathers to bring your sons to this meeting. We will make a study of the need for more ministers in our Conference and denomination. The reason behind this is that we believe God is still calling men to his ministry, but in the rush of life there may be some who do not hear the call. We hope that in this meeting our listening may be turned toward God's voice. For our inspiration we will have at this meeting a father and son who have responded to the call to the ministry. They will give us some idea of the great privileges that come to those who heed the call to "go into all the world and preach the Gospel."

By vote of the Laymen's Fellowship, I am directed to make this one request. Let us elect our own chairman. We feel that now we are able to stand alone. We appreciate the interest of the Conference in getting the Fellowship started. We hope that you will continue to be a guiding hand over us, and we promise to work with the Conference in all matters that pertain to the great work of the kingdom of God.

By authority of the vote of conference in adopting the report of the Committee on the Ministry, the ordaining presbytery, F. C. Lester, chairman, ordained Lunnie Burgess and John Bowers to conference ordination. Rosser Lee Clapp was ordained as an Elder. Revs. L. M. Presnell and B. H. Lowdermilk presented the candidates; Rev. W. D. Roosa led the ordaining prayer; Rev. Eric T. Braund delivered the charge; and Rev. G. H. Veazey, presented the Bible.

Dr. Ray Gibbons, Director of Council for Social Action, was introduced by Dr. F. C. Lester, and spoke to the conference on Social Action. Conference recessed until 9:30 Thursday morning. The closing prayer was led by Mr. George T. Gunter, a former president of conference.

THURSDAY—MORNING SESSION.

Conference called to order at 9:30 A. M. by the president.

Hymn and prayer led by Rev. Bill Simmons.

The minutes of Wednesday's sessions were read and approved.

The enrollment of ministers and delegates was completed.

The report of the Executive Committee was presented as follows:

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Meetings of the Executive Committee of the Western North Carolina Conference were held on November 11, 1951; January 14, April 21, July 25, August 14, and September 21, 1952. Major action by the committee was as follows:

1. Approved a grant-mortgage of \$300.00 on the Flint Hill-Sophia parsonage, and authorized the president and secretary to secure an attorney and complete the contract

with the Congregational Building Society.

2. Interpreted the action of last Conference to mean that all ministers in regular standing in this Conference who are serving churches within the Southern Convention are to be insured according to plans presented by the Southern Convention. The treasurer was authorized to pay on this basis.

3. Reverends John Bowers and Rosser Lee Clapp were received as licentiates from the North Carolina and Virginia Conference of Congregational Christian Churches.

4. Voted to approve delegates to the Southern Convention as recommended by the

various churches.

5. Voted to pay \$200.00 on expense of

5. Voted to pay \$200.00 on expense of delegates to the General Council, and at the request of the president, the amount was divided equally between Mrs. Clyde Fields, Cyrus Shoffner, and Dr. and Mrs. Lester, who were elected as our delegates. Mr. Shoffner could not go, and did not use the money.

6. License was granted Bill Simmons who finished sophomore work in May, and he was licensed by the president on August 17, 1952, in our Albemarle Church.

7. With regret, the Siler City work was discontinued for the present. It is hoped that at a later date there may be a greater response there.

8. Sybrant Pell was elected to represent this Conference on the Southern Conven-

tion committee for the campaign for the Building Society.

9. Rev. W. T. Madren was elected chairman of the committee on stewardship to fill the vacancy caused by the moving away of Rev. Clyde Fields.

10. Voted to elect as members of the Sustaining Fund for Elon College, Dr. F. C. Lester, and Revs. M. A. Pollard, W. T. Madren, and R. T. Grissom.

11. Letters of transfer were granted to Rev. W. W. Hall to our Massachusetts conference and Rev. Clyde L. Fields to our Eastern Virginia Conference.

A complete record of all meetings and actions of the executive committee are in the hands of the Secretary, and can be seen by any member of Conference on request. This summary is submitted for information, and approval.

The report of the Executive Committee was adopted.

Rev. Winfred Bray spoke of the attempt to organize a church in Siler City, explaining to conference the situation there.

The report of Committee on Evangelism was presented by Rev. R. T. Grissom, and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM.

A new interest in the values of spiritual man is manifested when the physical man sees his failures. In our age the world seems to have reached a state of material wealth, but an age of spiritual poverty. The strength of our youth is being spent and

sacrificed for reasons vague to many of the best informed people of our day. Communism has taken root in the hearts of peoples of the world. These and other facts make us turn to God as the only way out of the present state of uncertainty and unrest.

Your Committee on Evangelism has done considerable thinking and praying that there may be help given to our Southern Convention in these days of gloom. This report will be made on the basis of the findings of your committee with the other Conference committees of the Southern Convention. This joint committee met in Henderson, North Carolina, on September 23rd, of this year. The following will give you our findings.

- 1. That Evangelism is the life blood of our church, and must be encouraged:
 - A. Through the Sunday School.
 - B. Through the Church—pulpit and pew.
 - C. Through an active pastors' class.
- 2. That there are those who need "Re-evangelizing."
 - A. The new people who move into the community, who have lost their church zeal and life.
 - B. The people who for some cause have lost interest in the church of the community in which they have lived all their lives.
- 3. That there must be a personal reason for Evangelism. "I believe Jesus lived and died for me and all mankind: a free gift from God; that I and every other person might have life here and now, and through all eternity. In loving recognition of this gift from God to me, I am impelled to bear my witness of that love and gift; by word, and deed, and life. By corporate action with my brethern who likewise recognize God's love, and His Supreme Gift. I shall with them seek to find and use the best possible method to bring others to an acceptance and recognition of this love and Gift."

The September meeting closed with these recommendations for our Southern Convention:

- 1. That we have a special Evangelistic period throughout the convention. The suggested date is February 25th to Easter.
- 2. That each church have some special evangelistic emphasis during this period. Methods mentioned were
 - a. Preaching mission.
 - b. Revival services.
 - c. Pastors' class.
 - d. Visitation Evangelistic Campaign (carefully planned).

The committee recommended to each church that we urge regular church attendance, with a hope that they will become more interested in the church and its Christ.

The following recommendation was adopted for approval of the individual conferences:

That due to Evangelism plans now in progress, and others to be made; that the Conference Committee on Nominations be asked to retain the same chairman for the coming year.

The report on Christian Education was presented by Bill Simmons, and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

Christian Education is the purpose of the Church School, and of the Church as well. The program should be Christ-centered. It should provide training for the individual in every phase of Christian living. This will include the inner-self, so the

person can become a worthy citizen in the kingdom of God. This universe is God's venture to see whether man can succeed in building a kingdom of joy and lasting peace, of truth and eternal love. The educational program of the Church should seek to develop persons who will build such a kingdom here on earth.

Is it fair to say that the educational program in our average church has no definite aim or purpose? Decisions as to programs and methods appear to be made without reference to what is best for all concerned. The aim should be to develop Christ-like character. To reach this goal we need the best materials and methods available.

Your committee is eager to help local schools in every possible way. Call on us whenever you like. The following recommendations may help:

- 1. Use our own literature. Superintendents are asked to give this matter serious consideration. Albemarle and Seagrove schools began using Pilgrim Series materials in October.
- 2. Hold Vacation Bible Schools. We are pleased to report 19 such schools this year, which is an increase over last year.
- 3. Use visual aids. Black boards, flannelgraphs, pictures, slides and films are useful aids. The excellent movie for this year is "More for Peace," and can be secured through the Convention Office at Elon.
- 4. Support Elon College. It is our college, and it needs our students and our money. We are pleased to report that about fifteen young people from our Conference are students there.
- 5. Send young people to camps and conferences this year. We need to train our youth through these agencies.

We deeply appreciate the hospitality of the host church shown us during the Convention.

The superintendents' meeting was held last March at the Asheboro Church, and was a great success. We are planning to have another meeting at a time not yet determined.

The Convention will meet on Tuesday after the second Sunday in July, 1953, at Hank's Chapel Church, near Pittsboro, N. C.

The report on Religious Literature was presented by Winifred Bray as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

Through the years our people have been urged to read the best in Christian literature. Reading will cause us to be better educated, if we use the best books and news sheets. We have noticed that many children read the comic books and the funny section of the newspapers, and look on television for their main information. is fine, but good books and the Bible should be handled and read by these children. Your committee recommends that the parents should check the children's books and get the best for them to read. They also recommend that they encourage the children to read the Bible, or, better still, read the Bible to them.

For over one hundred years the churches of North Carolina have published The Christian Sun. This paper gives us news about our churches, the Convention, missions, college, youth, laymen, and orphanage. The Christian Sun should be in every home and every member of the family should read it. Give it your support by subscribing, reading, and sending in worthwhile news.

We want to recommend that everyone read the Bible more each day, because it is a sufficient guide for all people. And, too, the Revised edition of the entire Bible has now been published. This is easy to understand and you should see and read a copy soon. Daily Bible reading will help everyone to be better prepared in years to come.

We recommend that this Conference publish some type of monthly newspaper. We feel this paper will help each of us in our churches to become better acquainted, and also give us new ideas for better work. If such an idea should be adopted by the Conference, we would like to see every church participate one hundred percent. If this paper is a success, you must subscribe for it, read it, and send all your church news in each month.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE REPORT.

- 1. That we adopt the conference fund as recommended by the Committee on Apportionment, and that we do not attempt to raise the dollar per member this year.
- 2. That if during the year it appears to be feasible, the Executive Committee be authorized to secure a part-time worker if sufficient funds can be made available.
- 3. That no attempt be made for a regular issue of a conference news sheet, but that an occasional news letter be sent when advisable.

The report of the Special Committee was adopted.

Report on Church Grouping was presented by Rev. T. D. Sutton, and was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH GROUPING.

It is the belief of your Committee on Church Grouping that the Western North Carolina Conference has formed such a committee and given then a part on this program for the purpose of rendering some help to our churches and ministers.

As to this committee rendering any helpful service this past year, we are not sure. Although, we were invited to attend a meeting at the Pleasant Ridge Church with the pulpit committees of Pleasant Ridge, Ramseur, Union Grove and Spoon's Chapel Churches. There were two members of the Church Grouping Committee present.

As chairman of this committee the Biscoe Church asked me to write letters for them to be sent to the following churches: Big Oak, Flint Hill (M), and Brown's Chapel and their pastors to see if they would be interested in forming a group with one pastor to serve them. Of the four churches, three were in favor of forming a group. One church replied that they were satisfied with their present set-up.

Two members of the Church Grouping Committee did meet at the called meeting by the President of the Conference at the Asheboro Church.

All of us know to make Church Grouping a useful thing in this Conference simply means that the churches that are closely located will have to come together in an agreement to call a minister in their field to serve them and not have a minister driving across the Conference to serve two or three churches. We, also, know that it will save time and expense for the minister and enable the churches to receive more pastoral service when the minister is living close to his churches.

According to our rules, if churches ever group together in groups it will have to be done by the churches and not by any committee. The committee can suggest and do as much as the churches will allow them.

Therefore, the committee reminds the churches that the greater responsibility is theirs when it comes to Church Grouping.

We commend the churches that have grouped together and ask for our services.

The Home Missions report was presented by Rev. J. Q. Pugh as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

Some progress has been made in this Conference during the past year, but greater work could have done if there had been more money available. For instance, if we could have put a minister in Siler City and help to build a church, success might have come to us there. And Bailey's Grove needs a new building. Here are opportunities for us. And there are many more.

It is important that the lay members of our churches become aware of the work that needs to be done, and the ways in which they can help. Last year the Conference voted to ask each member to give a dollar so we can get needed work done righter in our midst. Membership in the C. M. A. is another way to help. Your committee fully believes that a hearty response in these two ways will mean a new day for our Conference.

We recommend that:

- 1. Each church pay the dollar per member as voted last year, and that C. M. A. memberships be greatly increased.
- 2. The churches unite in pastorates so there can be more effective work done by the ministers, since we have so few ministers.
- 3. Pastors urge their members to become tithers, for God said: "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, . . . if I will not . . . pour you out a blessing, that there will not be room enough to receive it."
 - 4. All churches pay their Apportionments in full.
 - 5. Sophia and Flint Hill churches be granted \$100 on their parsonage.

6. A field worker be secured to give at least part time to the work of the Conference, and that payment be made from the mission funds of the Conference.

THURSDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Called to order at 1:30 P. M. by the president.

Hymn and prayer led by Max Vestal.

Items 1 and 6 of Home Missions report to be rewritten so as to read as recorded in the Special Committee report Item 1 and 2, respectively. This was adopted.

The report on Foreign Missions was presented by Rev. L. M. Presnell, chairman, and was adopted as follows.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Your committee had a meeting on September 14 at our Asheboro Church with Max Vestal and L. M. Presnell present. We reported to the larger group there that day as follows:

"Do unto others as you would have them do to you." We have never known religious persecution as it exists in many parts of the world today. We have never been kept away from church by the civil authorities. We have never been afraid to declare publicly our belief in God. We have never been constantly afraid for our very lives. And it is true that we have never thought much about the people in foreign lands who live with these problems.

"There are millions of people on this earth, our brothers, who have not even heard of Jesus Christ. There are millions of people, our brothers, who are being overrun with Communism, a false doctrine that denies the very existence of God. There are millions of our brothers in foreign lands who are naked, hungry, sick and in prison. Will we minister to them, remembering that to do so is to minister unto Jesus Christ? Jesus gathered the whole world to His feet. When we turn our backs on any of His children, we turn our backs on the Master. This is not the direction that the W. N. C. Conference wishes to turn. Only as we accept the cross can we hope to realize Christ's kingdom on earth. Only so can we see peace rising over war, understanding over ignorance, and love over hate."

There are many things we can do. One is to pay Apportionment in full. This we hope all churches will do. The Women's Societies are to be commended for the work they are doing.

We recommend that each church have mission study and use the penny a meal plan during Mission Period.

Let us remember that the more we give the Gospel to others the more we have for ourselves. That applies to all church organizations—Sunday school, laymen, women, and young people.

MINISTERIAL AND CHURCH RELATIONS.

It is essential that every church have a minister to lead and instruct the people in morals and religion. The primary purpose of every church should be to win souls to Christ. "Whosoever will be chief among you, let him be your servant."

The Church should cooperate with the minister in planning the work, and working the plan, that the power and influence of the church will be felt throughout the entire brotherhood and community. This will be the case if Ministerial and Church Relations are as they should be.

We recommend that the church cooperate more carefully and prayerfully with the minister in every phase of the work, keeping in mind the words of Jesus when he said, "I will build my Church," and never forget the fact that "Jesus loved the Church and gave himself for it."

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP AND APPORTIONMENTS.

The apostle Paul was a past master at raising money for the work of the Lord. In preparing the Corinthian Church for an offering, he wrote: "Wherefore show ye to them, and before the churches, the proof of your love, and of our boasting on your behalf." This statement about proving your love got them. A large offering was received; the starving people in Jerusalem were fed; and the church at Corinth received a greater blessing.

Our talk about loving God is not sufficient proof of our love unless it is coupled with action—the stewardship of Time, Talent, and Treasure. We do not prove our love to God by just piously thanking him for blessings, and asking for more. To prove our love we must make real sacrifice for time, talent, and treasurc. Furthermore, we must prove our love on God's terms. We must give through his Church that mothers the soul.

We ask, "How much?" The Jew, under the Law, was required to tithe. To the Christian Jesus says: "Unless your righteousness exceeds that of the Scribes and Pharisees you shall in no case enter the kingdom of heaven."

Three principles of Christian stewardship should be kept in mind. This is God's world. We are stewards in God's world. We must give an account of our stewardship.

The following recommendations point out ways in which we can prove our love as Christian stewards We recommend:

- 1. That this Conference adopt apportionments as listed on the other side of this paper and make it part of its records; that each church accept the apportionments as a sacred obligation and consider them as minimum amounts to be given to these enterprises; and that each item be paid in full before overpayment is made on any one.
- 2. That each church pay 20 cents per member to the Conference treasurer for ministerial insurance. This should be paid by December 15, 1952.
- 3. That the minimum salary for a full-time pastor, with family, be \$3,000.00 and parsonage.
- 4. That each minister be a member of the Annuity Fund, and that the churches pay one half of the dues of at least 6 per cent of salary.
- 5. That the churches seek to raise \$1.00 per member for a Sustaining Fund for Elon College, and cooperate in the effort to complete the campaign for \$2,500,000.00 for Elon College.
- 6. That the Conference and churches cooperate with the Building Department of the Home Boards of our denomination in raising \$4,500,000.00 for a Loan Fund. This Conference is asked to raise \$11,476.00 by March 1, 1956. We recommend that our goal be \$11,500.00, and that we do our best to secure that amount.

We further recommend that the Conference President, Conference Church Building Loan Fund Campaign Chairman—Mr. S. H. Pell—and the Convention Chairman—Mr. M. T. Garren—complete the Conference organization for the Campaign, and that the Conference Campaign Committee allocate quotas to the several churches of the Conference, and with the Convention and National Campaign Committees promote the purposes of the Campaign to a successful conclusion.

7. That the committee on stewardship be responsible for at least one Stewardship Institute during the year, and that the churches promote stewardship through the church, Sunday school and other agencies.

A motion was adopted by Conference to refer the adjustment of Apportionments and other matters of finance to the Executive Committee.

The report on Moral Reform was presented by Rev. M. L. Fogleman, and was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM.

We have no secret word tucked away in our mind that we are about to utter which will cause a Reformation to be placed on our doorstep. The corruptness has not been brought upon our land because someone spoke a magic word, but because down through the years seeds have been sown that have sprouted, and grown, and today are blossoming forth toward a bountiful harvest.

None of us want to take the blame for sowing these seeds. It must have been done by an enemy while we were asleep.

If we are to overcome this evil we must overcome with good. We recommend we sow seeds of goodness in the places they will bring the best results.

1 - The Home.

It has been said, "The hand that rocks the cradle rules the world." We believe that parents should spend more time rocking the cradle, and planting seeds of goodness on these tender hearts.

2 - The Church

We, as Christians, are commissioned to go into all the world and preach the Gospel. Let us go forth with full assurance that "The Word" is powerful to combat evil.

3 — Our Schools.

The schools of our land should work in unity with the homes and churches. On a few occasions young people have come to us with this problem on their minds. They had received definite teaching in their home and church. Since they had gone to school some things were placed before them there that were contrary to their previous training. We do not believe any school has the right to teach anything that would tempt our youth to disobey their parents in the Lord, or contrary to the teaching of Christ. We should keep in close contact with our schools and work together for the advancement of better moral conditions.

The report on Superannuation was presented by Mr. A. E. Cox, and was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUPERANNUATION.

The relief work among our retired ministers, ministers' widows and dependents is supported by the Board of Superannuation through our national Board of Home Missions, New York. Money contributed for Superannuation through the Apportionment is paid by the churches direct to the Convention Office. The Convention remits all funds received to our New York office, and regular checks are mailed to our pensioners. We regret to say that our contributions to the Division of Ministerial Relief of our Board of Home Missions from the Convention are considerably below the amounts which they in turn pay to our pensioners.

We urge our churches to pay in full the Apportionment for Superannuation and exceed it if possible. We ask each church to see that their pastor is a member of the Annuity Fund of the denomination. We urge every church to receive a special Christmas offering for our aged ministers, the Veterans of the Cross. This offering constitutes a fund from which extra checks are sent to our retired ministers; also to cases of hardship or sickness.

At the 1952 session of the Southern Convention it was voted that the work of the Board of Superannuation should be done through our Mission Board of the Conven-

tion. In future Apportionment, therefore, there is an item, "National Home Missions and Ministerial Relief." This item replaces the former item designated "Superannuation." In the Conference Year 1952-53 we urge our people to pay in full this item for our National Home Missions, that our aged ministers may be adequately supported.

We subscribe to the Cardinal Principles and Government of the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, and being desirous of associating ourselves in Christ with the North Carolina and Virginia Conference of the Southern Convention, we agree to submit ourselves to the Brethren in the Lord, and to be governed by the Principles and Government of the Congregational Christian Churches of the Southern Convention.

We hereby associate ourselves as Charter Members of the Lakeview Community Church (Congregational Christian), R. F. D., Burlington, North Carolina; we invite other persons to join us in this Christian enterprise either by Confession of Faith in Jesus Christ, Reaffirmation of Faith, or by Letter of Transfer from other evangelical churches; and we hereby request membership in the North Carolina and Virginia Conference.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

We, your Executive Committee, approved the following resolution on December 3, 1951:

RESOLUTION.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Executive Committee of the North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference (a member of the Southern Christian Convention, and of the General Council of the Congregational Christian Church) in session regularly called and held on this the 3rd day of December, 1951, at Durham, North Carolina, notice of which meeting was given in apt time to all members of the Committee, and a quorum being present, that the officers and/or trustees of the First Congregational Christian Church of Greensboro, North Carolina be and they are hereby authorized in the name of said local church to borrow from Security National Bank of Greensboro, North Carolina, from time to time, and in such amounts as they may deem necessary, funds or money for the purpose of paying for labor and materials to be used in the construction of the new building of said church in the City of Greensboro; and that said Conference does hereby give its consent to said borrowing and to the pledge of any or all property of the church to secure the repayment of money so borrowed, regardless of in whose name the title to any property of the local church now stands; (\$90,000.00).

I, William J. Andes, Secretary of the Executive Committee of the North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference, do hereby certify that the foregoing is a true and exact copy of the resolution unanimously adopted at a meeting of the Executive Committee of said Conference duly and regularly called and held at the time and place stated in the resolution, of which meeting notice was given in apt time and which meeting was attended by a quorum or majority of the members of the Committee.

The president of the conference was asked to confer with Superintendent W. T. Scott as to the advisability of a joint session of the Executive Committees of the three North Carolina Conferences. Such a meeting was held at Elon College on January 7, 1952, to work out plans for "Group Insurance" for pastors and their dependents. The following agreements were made:

- 1. That each Conference will pay the insurance premium for its enrolled ministers (ordained, licensed, local ordination, local licensure) serving as pastors or assistant pastors within the Southern Convention, provided the church or churches served pay their insurance and Conference Fund.
- 2. Supply pastors will not be covered.
- 3. If a man ceases to be a pastor and is covered by this insurance, his insurance will cease after thirty-one (31) days unless special arrangements are made.
- The conference would pay on Annual Basis in advance, unless other provision is made.
- 5. Pastors should place their membership in the conference where they serve churches.

Your Committee approved on March 20, 1952, the following letters of transfer on recommendation of the Committee on the Ministry:

Andes, Secretary of the Executive Committee of the North Carolina-Virginia Christian Conference, a North Carolina corporation, do hereby certify that the following are exact copies of two Resolutions unanimously passed by the Executive Committee of said corporation at a meeting held at Durham, North Carolina, on the 7th day of August, 1952; and I do further certify that under the By-Laws of said corporation, the Executive Committee of said Corporation is empowered to transact any necessary business of the corporation between annual sessions of the Conference.

"Be It Resolved, That for good and sufficient reasons appearing to the Executive Committee of the North Carolina-Virginia Christian Conference, the president and the secretary of the said Conference are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to execute and deliver a deed for the property owned by the Conference at the northeast corner of Walker Avenue and Eugene Street, in the City of Greensboro, North Carolina, which has for many years been used by the First Congregational Christian Church of Greensboro, North Carolina, said deed to be to the Trustees of said church and their successors in office, for and in consideration of the sum of One Dollar and other valuable considerations."

"Be It Resolved, That the First Congregational Christian Church of Greensboro, North Carolina, is hereby given permission by the North Carolina-Virginia Christian Conference to borrow the sum of Ninety Thousand (\$90,-000.00) Dollars from Security Life and Trust Company of Winston-Salem, North Carolina, and as collateral for said loan, to execute a deed of trust securing said loan on the new church located on Radiance Drive, the old church located on Walker Avenue, and the parsonage located on Edgeworth Street, all in the City of Greensboro, North Carolina;

"And the said church is also given permission to execute a second deed of trust in the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars on the new church property on Radiance Drive, to secure a \$20,000.00 loan from the Congregational Church Building Society in New York, N. Y.

"The consent of the Conference for giving security on these loans is made under the provisions of Chapter III, Part II, in the *Manual* of the Southern Convention."

H. E. Robinson led a panel discussion on the "Problems of the Local Church." W. T. Scott spoke on "Ministerial Leadership," H. P. Bozarth on "The Inactive Church Members," J. S. Graves on "Christian Education," and W. E. Wisseman on "Church Finances."

The report of the Committee on the Ministry was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE MINISTRY.

We, your Committee on the Ministry, offer the following recommendations relative to ministerial personnel of the Conference:

Licentiate G. Julius Rice is pastor of Hines Chapel and Monticello Churches. He has recently graduated from Elon College, and is making application for ordination. The churches which he is serving as pastor have reported favorably on the work that he is doing and request that he be ordained. After a careful examination, it is recommended that Brother Rice be given Conference Ordination at this session of Conference.

It is recommended that the request of Brother John T. Bowers that his standing be transferred to the Western North Carolina Congregational Christian Conference be

granted.

Licentiate A. Warren Matthews is now taking his first year of seminary work. He requests that his license be continued. It is recommended that Brother Matthews be continued as a licentiate.

Rev. John R. Lackey continues as pastor of Apple's Chapel and is studying at the Duke Divinity School. It is recommended that his Conference Ordination be continued for another year.

Rev. William Rich has requested that his ministerial standing be transferred to the Eastern North Carolina Conference. It is recommended that the Conference approve his transfer.

Rev. William P. Smith has accepted a pastorate in the Eastern Virginia Conference, and requests that he be granted a letter of transfer to that Conference. It is recommended that he be granted a transfer of his ministerial standing.

Rev. Percy Ricketts has reported to this committee that he has applied for membership and has been received into the Evangelical Methodist Church. It is recommended that his name be dropped from the ministerial roll of this Conference.

Brother Herman Lee Johnson, a member of the Biblical Class and a member of the Junior Class at Elon College, has been serving as pastor of Zion Church, Alamance County. He is the new pastor of Berea. He appeared before this committee and requested licensure. After due examination, it is recommended that he be licensed at this session of Conference.

Licentiate Rosser Lee Clapp has requested that his standing be transferred to the Western North Carolina Conference. It is recommended that Conference approve his transfer.

Rev. James R. Hailey has reported that he has been received into the fellowship of the Methodist Church as a minister. It is recommended that he be dropped from the ministerial roll of this Conference.

Brother Staley M. Sorrell, a member of the Biblical Class of this Conference, reports that he has been licensed by the Gospel Fellowship Association of the Bob Jones University. It is recommended that his name be dropped from the Biblical Class.

Licentiate John Graves completed his work at the Hartford Seminary Foundation and made application for ordination. This committee recommended to the Executive Committee that he be ordained. This was done as reported by the Executive Committee.

Brother William P. Tolly, a member of the Biblical Class, and a first year student at Hartford Ceminary, requests that he be licensed. It is recommended that Conference approve the licensing of Brother Tolly.

Rev. J. Lester Stanley is pastor of our Gibsonville Church, and is doing acceptable work. It is recommended that his Conference Ordination be continued for another

year.

Rev. Edgar J. Clawson, pastor of Long's Chapel, has made a satisfactory report of this work. It is recommended that his Conference Ordination be continued for another year.

It is recommended that Rev. Timothy Chang be continued as a licentiate.

It is recommended that Rev. I. T. Underwood be continued as a licentiate.

Rev. William T. Scott, Jr., is in his senior year at Yale Divinity School. It is recommended that he be continued as a licentiate.

Brother Sammy Nelson, a Junior at Elon College and a member of the Biblical Class, requests licensure. It is recommended that he be continued as a member of the Biblical Class for another year.

Brother Fred H. Wrenn, who is a first year student at Elon College, requests admission to the Biblical Class. It is recommended that he be enrolled as a member of the Biblical Class.

Brother Curtis Young, a member of the freshman class at Elon College, requests membership in the Biblical Class. The Durham Congregational Christian Church, of which he is a member, recommended him as a suitable candidate for the ministry. It is recommended that he be enrolled as a member of the Biblical Class.

Brother Randall C. Mason, Jr., is a candidate for the ministry in care of the New Jersey Association C. C. C., and is a member of of the Junior Class of Trinity College of Duke University. He has been called to be pastor of the Mebane Church.

It is recommended that this relationship be approved.

Rev. Richard M. Petersen, who is serving as pastor of the Shallow Ford Church of this Conference, came before your committee for examination. Some years ago he was licensed by the Kentucky-Tennessee Conference. He was duly examined as to his Christian convictions, his academic training, and his experience in church work. It was voted to recommend to the Executive Committee of Conference that he be ordained. This recommendation was approved, and he was ordained as set forth in the report of the Executive Committee.

At the last session of Conference it was voted that Brother John Perry Littiken be enrolled as a member of the Conference Biblical Class. At his request it is recommended that his standing be transferred to the Eastern North Carolina Conference.

Conference adjourned for lunch. W. J. Andes pronounced the benediction.

The Conference was called to order at 1:30 P. M.

The report of the Committee on Stewardship was presented:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP.

Your Committee could make suggestions about stewardship, everyone of which has been made in the past. Giving and tithing and money are old and familiar words, and many people have long since tired of them.

We feel that more emphasis should be placed on the consecration of talents than on the offering of tithes. If we did this our money problems would in quick and nat-

ural order take care of themselves.

We would urge the informing of our people of the educational and mission programs of Christianity. Our own denomination has the program of "Our Christian World Mission", and this we feel concerns all of us. To accomplish this program it will take the deepest of consecration of our talents, yea, even of our life.

Where a man's heart is there will he pour his gold.

The report of the Committee on Stewardship was adopted.

The report of the Committee on Budget and Apportionments was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BUDGET AND APPORTIONMENT.

It is the hope of your committee that all churches make an earnest effort to pay all apportionments in full for the year just ending.

Elon College is in the midst of a campaign to reach a goal of two and a half million dollars for buildings and endowments. This campaign was authorized by the Board of Trustees of the College and by the Southern Convention. We, your committee, recommend that this conference give all-out support to this campaign in prayer, work, and gifts.

The General Council, meeting at Claremont, Calif., in June, 1952, voted to raise four and a half million dollars to be added to the Church Building Society Loan Fund. The Executive Board of the Convention voted to accept \$135,000.00 as the Convention's share of the above amount; the \$135,000.00 to include \$25,000.00 for each year of the biennium, voted by the Convention and designated as an authorized special for the Mission Board. The Finance Committee of the Convention was authorized to allocate the \$135,000.00 to the various conferences of the Convention. The North Carolina and Virginia Conference is requested to set as its goal \$50,552.00. We recommend that the quota be accepted and allocated to the churches within the conference; and authorize the Conference Campaign Committee, in cooperation with the Convention and National Campaign Committees, to complete the campaign within the conference; that the campaign begin March 1, 1953 and the solicitation be completed by January 1, 1954, it being understood that payments on quotas may be completed by March 1, 1956, that all funds paid in for this campaign be channelled through the Convention Treasury.

We recommend the following schedule of apportionments for the churches of our

conference; that churches accept the amounts allocated to them and adopt the practice of paying on apportionments by monthly or quarterly installments.

The Conference reconvened.

The report of the Committee on Home Missions was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

Because of limited funds your Committee on Home Missions has not been able to do many of the things it wanted to do. However, we are happy to report that the home mission projects within our Conference are making rapid progress and are showing great promise at the present time.

- 1. Beverly Hills—Burlington: Under Rev. W. W. Snyder's leadership is really going places. They have shown a large increase in membership and have a good crowd of interested people for all their regular services. The church is well organized now and has a real promising future.
- 2. Lakeview—near Burlington: Under the leadership of Rev. John Truitt, Jr., has been organized with a strong unit of charter members. A Sunday School, Woman's Missionary Society, and a youth group have been organized with the work as a whole going nicely. This group has been holding its services in the Glencoe School, and they are now thinking of building an educational unit of their own.
- 3. Zion—near Burlington: Rev. Bland Leebrick is now pastor of this work. Rev. G. C. Crutchfield and Rev. Herman Johnson have been working with these people for the past year or so, and the work has been coming along fine. This church may not develop into a large church, but it can do a real service for its community. They already have the first unit of their building far enough along to be using it.

New Prospective Fields—A few weeks ago Conference officials met at South Boston, Virginia, with a group of about 250 interested people from Virgilina, Ingram, Pleasant Grove, Liberty, Lebanon, and Hebron Churches. The prospects for a new church in South Boston are good. Maybe these churches in Halifax County would like to sponsor this new work. You will probably be hearing more about this possibility in the near future.

We have been told that there are a large number of people in Danville who might be interested in another church there. We plan to look into this situation as soon as we can.

We urge that the Conference as a whole really get behind these new projects and give them our loyal support.

The report of the Committee on Evangelism was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM.

The committee of "Evangelism and Devotional Life" of the Southern Convention and the chairman of each conference committee of Evangelism met at the Henderson Church, September 23, 1952. The meeting began at 2:00 P. M. and ended at 10:00 P. M. We prayerfully faced our problems of today and our failures of yesterday. We sought the wisdom of God in what we believed should be the primary purpose of every church in the convention. We, in faith, asked God to enlighten us, that we may inspire our ministers and church members to a working and a successful program of Evangelism.

At this meeting many good suggestions were offered. We studied past reports adopted by our conferences. These reports were good! The trouble is not with them. We agreed that our ministers and our churches had not taken them seriously. We agreed, further, if we are to "Evangelize" the world to Christ, there must be a complete acceptance of the commission given to us by the Saviour himself. We must in his name and spirit tell the good news about God.

Your conference committee of Evangelism, in cooperation with the Convention committee, recommends the following:

1. That our ministers continue preaching Evangelism from the pulpit.

2. That every church have a well-planned Visitation program.

3. That we re-evangelize those already in the church.

4. That we have an effective program of Evangelism in every local church.

5. That we encourage regular church attendance.

- That every minister preach at least once a year on the "Principles and Government" of our Church.
- 7. That we have a special "Evangelism Period" throughout the Convention. The date being February 25, 1953 through Easter Sunday.
- 8. That every church have some special Evangelistic emphasis during this period.
- 9. That we accept the plans and program set up by the Convention committee of "Evangelism and Devotional Life."

It was moved and carried that the Conference Nominating Committee nominate three people to the Home Mission Board and that we ask the Conference Missionary Association to elect three people to the Home Mission Board, that the chairman of the Home Mission Board and the president of the Conference Missionary Association be the same person.

Conference adjourned until the night session with L. E. Smith pronouncing the benediction.

TUESDAY—EVENING SESSION.

Conference called to order for the evening session at 7:30 P. M.

Wm. K. Newman showed a film on "The Church Building Society."

G. C. Crutchfield and the choir of the Bethlehem church led the worship service. W. T. Scott introduced Ray Gibbons, Director of the Council for Social Action, who spoke on "Strong Encouragement."

The benediction was pronounced by G. C. Crutchfield.

WEDNESDAY—MORNING SESSION.

Conference called to order at 9:30 A. M.

Herman Lee Johnson led the hymn and the prayer.

Minutes of Tuesday's sessions were read and approved.

There was no report from the Historian, S. C. Harrell.

The report of the Committee on Christian Education was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

- 1. Young People. Curtis Young of Durham was re-elected President of Pilgrim Fellowship at the October, 1952, Rally in Durham; Lois Scott, Vice-President; Wilma Ann Saunders, Secretary; and Patricia Gordon, Treasurer. A special project this year was the purchase of \$100.00 worth of hymnals for Jose Dabuet, the Philippine student, who returned home during the year to take charge of a church. The Spring Rally for the North Carolina youth at Elon included a proportionate representation of our young people in the six hundred present.
- 2. The North Carolina and Virginia Conference Sunday School Convention met June 26th at Belew Creek, some 200 attending. Martin Garren was elected president.

The Sunday School Superintendents held an excellent training session at the Monticello Church, March 7th, when the film "The Superintendent Wants to Know" was presented, and talks were made on "Adiministration" and "Literature."

- 3. Leadership Training Schools were held this year by the Greensboro Church in January, and the Burlington, First Church, in February for leaders of surrounding areas.
- 4. Summer Conferences for junior and junior high youngsters were again held at Crabtree in June with capacity attendance, our churches having their full quota in attendance. The Pilgrim Fellowship Conference at Elon College the last of June was well attended and ably conducted by Rev. Henry E. Robinson of Burlington.
- 5. The Elon College campaign to complete the Building Fund Program begun five years ago is now under way, with hopes it may be completed in March, 1953. This is our opportunity to place the college on a level with the best of our church-related colleges in equipment, and we solicit the support of every friend and alumnus of the school in our Conference. The Sustaining Fund which goes for the support of the current expenses of the school is vitally needed also and increasing numbers of our churches are placing this item in their regular church budgets. We urge all to do so.

Pending the adoption of the report of the Committee on Christian Education, Pattie Lee Coghill gave previews of the activities concerning Christian Education that would be held during the year, 1952-1953.

The report of the Committee on Christian Education was adopted.

The report of the Committee on Pilgrim Fellowship was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PILGRIM FELLOWSHIP.

The main project of the North Carolina and Virginia Conference Young People during the past year was to raise money for the bringing of Jose Dabuet, a student from the Philippines, to the United States to study. This money, which amounted to \$375.00, was paid into the treasury of the Southern Convention Young People since the project was convention-wide.

When Jose was ready to leave the United States, the idea to give him a going-away present was originated in the North Carolina and Virginia Conference. Jose said he was going to need hymnals for his church, so money was asked for and we received about \$105.00 for this project.

A Work Day for Christ was held in the fall. This was a project in which the young people worked and gave whatever they made to be applied on their apportionment.

At Thanksgiving and Christmas many groups adopted families.

Twenty-Five Dollars was taken from the treasury to be applied on traveling expenses for Curtis Young when he attended the National Pilgrim Fellowship Council held in Pomona, California, during the middle of last summer.

There have been three conference rallies. One was a week-end fellowship conference held at New Hope Camp, located about six miles from Chapel Hill.

The young people of the North Carolina and Virginia Conference led in attendance at the state-wide rally held in the spring at Elon. There were 304 persons attending representing nearly all the churches in the conference.

Before each rally, the officers met, planned the program for the rally, and discussed the overall program of the conference. There also was a president's rally for the purpose of working out the Pilgrim Fellowship program in the local group.

The individual groups have chosen other projects and carried them out.

Next year the main money raising project will be to collect funds for the building

of a cabin on the Southern Convention camp site, Moonelon.

Our hope is that we may increase our fellowship by helping to start Pilgrim Fellowship groups in the churches where there is no such group in existence. This is our special project for the coming year.

CURTIS YOUNG, Chairman.

The report was received to record.

The report of the Committee on Woman's Work was presented by Mrs. W. T. Scott, the new president of the North Carolina Woman's Conference, in the absence of the past president. Mrs. W. J. Andes.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON WOMAN'S WORK.

It is always a joy to report the results of "work well done" and we could hope that our immediate past president, Mrs. W. J. Andes, were present today to revel in the joys of the accomplishments of the North Carolina Woman's Missionary Conference during the past year. We have declared it a good year and we wish to express appreciation to this "good and faithful servant."

A bit of general information might prove helpful. We have 82 societies in our 108 churches, netting a membership of almost 2,000 women. The Conference is divided into seven Districts and fourteen Departments. The officers of the Conference, together with the presidents and superintendents of the districts and departments, respectively, comprise the Executive Board of the Conference.

We are pleased with last year's financial record, which shows a gain of about

\$450.00 over the previous year.

There have been five new societies organized during the year, namely, Lebanon, Pfafftown, Beverly Hills, Moore's Union, and Lakeview.

Looking toward our new year's work we are not incline to be satisfied with what has been accomplished but rather to pray for guidance as we plan for greater things in the future. "To cultivate the spirit of Christ in every area of human life" is our purpose.

The new Executive Board met in Raleigh at the United Church on October 23, 1952 and gave a full day's work in mapping out the plans and duties of each

department, and in setting some goals for the new year.

Some of the Districts have already met and set up their plans. Others are meeting soon. The District Presidents have called a meeting for December 3, 1952. At this time we shall make plans for our Spring Rallies. This is enough to tell you that we have started our new year's work.

One thing should be emphasized and that is that we give generously to our Thank Offering. Because of the great needs in our Carroll County mission, we have dared to set our Convention Thank Offering goal at \$5,000, which is much higher than last year's goal. This amount of money will enable the people at Rocky Ford "to go ahead" and build their new church. It is quite evident that in order to meet the Convention goal, there must be an increase in the giving to the Conference Thank Offering. We have faith that it can and will be done!

Our Mission study for the year 1952-53 is centered around two topics, Africa and Human Rights.

The theme is "Building with Love and Gratitude."

MRS. WILLIAM T. SCOTT. President.

The report of the Committee on Woman's Work was received to record.

The report of the Committee on Religious Literature was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

With every passing year the need for concern in the matter of religious training in the home increases. Radio and television have the opportunity to invade every sanctum of childhood. They are there to speak their message. The church should be

much concerned about what that message shall be. Our churches must learn to plant seed of goodwill and righteousness in the home every day—as nearly as possible every hour of the day, for in devious ways the spirit of neglect of godliness will find its way into the innermost place of the living of children, youth, and maturity. We may not call radio and television literature, but they have the right to, and do invade the innermost sanctum of our homes. From nursery room to the top of our national department of Social Action we should be fully cognizant of their potentialities.

Good books with beautiful print and pictures are available for little folks, and growing children. They should "belong" to childhood and girlhood and boyhood in an increasing way. Parents should avail themselves of such good books and teach their children to possess them and read them early. The printed page has not lost its power. Our church schools may do well to take seriously the literature which attracts their pupils during the week, make a study of it, and have regular recommendations to parents as to available books and magazines suitable for childhood and youth.

Already in many reports standard recommendations of the religious literature of the Church, and of our Convention and denomination, have been made.

Mrs. John G. Truitt, Chairman.

The report of the Committee on Religious Literature was adopted.

The work of the Christian Orphanage at Elon College, N. C., was presented by the Superintendent, J. G. Truitt.

The report of the Committee on Superannuation was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUPERANNUATION.

The relief work among our retired ministers, ministers' widows and dependents is supported by the Board of Superannuation through our national Board of Home Missions, New York. Money contributed for Superannuation through the Apportionment is paid by the churches direct to the Convention Office. The Convention remits all funds received to our New York office, and regular checks are mailed to our pensioners. We regret to say that our contributions to the Division of Ministerial Relief of our Board of Home Missions from the Convention are considerably below the amounts which they in turn pay to our pensioners.

We urge our churches to pay in full the Apportionment for Superannuation and exceed it if possible. We ask each church to see that their pastor is a member of the Annuity Fund of the denomination. We urge every church to receive a special Christmas offering for our aged ministers, the Veterans of the Cross. This offering constitutes a fund from which extra checks are sent to our retired ministers; also in cases of hardship or sickness.

At the 1952 session of the Southern Convention it was voted that the work of the Board of Superannuation should be done through our Mission Board of the Convention. In future Apportionment, therefore, there is an item "National Home Missions and Ministerial Relief." This item replaces the item designated "Superannuation." In the Conference Year 1952-53 we urge our people to pay in full this item for our national Home Missions, that our aged ministers may be adequately supported.

H. E. Robinson continued the discussion on "Local Church Problems."

The Christian Rural Overseas Program was presented by the state director, C. R. Key.

Ray Gibbons spoke on "Good Stewards."

Superintendent W. T. Scott presented the following bequest from the will of Miss M. Joanna Jones of Graham, N. C.

BEQUEST TO THE NORTH CAROLINA AND VIRGINIA CONFERENCE.

"I give and devise my home place and garden lot to the North Carolina and Virginia Conference of the Congregational Christian Church upon the express trust and for the uses and purposes solely as follows, namely, that my home place and garden lot be used by said Conference as a home for retired ministers of said denomination and their wives, perpetually."

(This will was executed April 21, 1952 and Attorney Clarence Ross, of Long and Ross, Graham, North Carolina, is the Executor of the estate of Miss M. Joanna Jones.)

It was moved and carried that the Executive Committee of the Conference act for the Conference in reaching a decision on the disposition of the bequest.

It was moved and carried that the Conference through its Executive Committee offer its good offices to Randall C. Mason, Jr., and the Mebane Church for any counsel or advice needed during the pastorate of Mr. Mason.

The progress of the Pastor's Insurance was reported by W. T. Scott to be improving and growing.

The Conference adjourned for lunch. J. S. Graves pronounced the benediction.

WEDNESDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference reconvened at 1:15 P. M.

B. A. Leebrick led the hymn and prayer.

The report of the Committee on Laymen's Fellowship was presented as follows:

REPORT ON LAYMEN'S FELLOWSHIP.

One meeting of the North Carolina and Virginia Conference Laymen was held during the past year. The Greensboro (First) Church was host for the occasion. Dr. Rockwell Harmon Potter of Hartford, Conn., inspired and delighted nearly two hundred of our conference men in an address at a dinner meeting.

Laymen's Sunday was observed by most of our churches on October 19th. Some churches held this service on another date due to a conflict of previously planned programs. These services, planned and given by the men, were highly successful and an inspiration to all.

Our men throughout the Conference are beginning to accept their responsibilities as never before. Instead of just a few men in each church who can be depended upon for lay work, we have an ever increasing number who are willing and wanting to do that which needs doing and really making their work felt by the churches—this is our main goal! May we continue to grow in numbers and spirit!

Moonelon, our major objective for all laymen, is beginning to gain headway. Reports are that a good many of our church groups have sent in their allotted donations for this initial work and others have sent in part of their allotment. We are eager to get enough money in to develop Moonelon to the extent that we may begin to use it. Later we can enlarge our efforts.

I urge every men's group in the Conference to make a special effort to push this work on to a successful completion. Our young people need Moonelon! Our church as a whole needs it!

I call attention again to the sixteen objectives recommended by our National Council to all Laymen's Fellowship groups:

- 1. A working organization of men in every local church.
- 2. A father and son banquet in each local church or district.
- 3. Annual fellowship visitation on some Sunday or during some week in each local church.
- 4. Observation of Laymen's Sunday in every church with laymen participating in a special service.
- 5. Churchmanship Institute for deacons and church officers.
- 6. Better business organization and administration in the work of the local church.
- 7. Promote subscriptions to The Christian Sun.
- 8. Maintain private and family devotions, Bible readings and prayers.
- Regular attendance at church, Sunday school, conference and convention meetings, and encourage others to do so.
- Encourage and promote better financial support of the local church, conference, and convention enterprises.
- 11. Encourage adequate salaries for pastors.
- 12. Improvement of church property.
- Sponsor one or more social fellowship meetings in the local church during the year.
- 14. Support the convention goal for evangelism—one new member per month per 100 members in every local church.
- 15. Support the convention goal for church extension—one new church in each conference per year.
- 16. Encourage and practice Christian principles in earning and using money.

MOTTO: Every layman working in his place in his church!

The report of the Committee on Memoirs was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS.

Dr. CHARLES E. NEWMAN.

Charles Everette Newman was born May 30, 1874 on his father's farm in Isle of Wight County, Virginia and died at his home in Virgilina, October 9, 1952. He attended the public schools of his native county until the age of 14, when he had to leave to work on his father's farm. He joined Oakland Christian Church at the age of 14 and his name remains on the roster of that church to this day.

In 1893 he entered the preparatory department of Elon College, where he remained until his graduation in 1899. After graduation he taught private school in Berkley (now South Norfolk, Va.).

He was licensed to preach in 1901 by the Eastern Virginia Conference and one year later was ordained to the full ministry by this conference. In 1903 to 1904 he attended the Seminary at Princeton University.

On June 23, 1904, he married Miss Mable Brittle of Southampton County, Virginia. To this union were born two daughters and four sons, all of whom are now living.

He served various churches in the Eastern Virginia, Eastern North Carolina and the North Carolina and Virginia Conferences. In 1916 he moved to his present home at Virgilina. His pastorate consisted of Union (Virgilina), Hebron, Liberty in Virginia, and Lebanon in North Carolina, where he remained until his retirement in 1946. Under his pastorate the Liberty Church was organized and built. The present brick

church building at Virgilina was constructed during his pastorate, and the remodeling project at Lebanon was instituted.

In 1944 recognizing his deep consecration and scholastic attainments Elon College conferred upon him the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Divinity, a well deserved honor.

Among his outstanding characteristics were his innate love of people, his inflexible faithfulness to duty, and his unfeigned piety to God. On these virtues he patterned his life.

Mrs. G. C. Crutchfield.

Mrs. G. C. Crutchfield passed away on August 1, 1952. She was the wife of Rev. G. C. Crutchfield, one of the leading pastors of the North Carolina and Virginia Conference. Mrs. Crutchfield was a wonderful helpmeet in both her home and in her husband's ministry. She was a faithful wife, a devoted mother, and a Christian lady of the first order. She discovered the secret of abundant living—that of giving herself in service to others.

We recommend that the conference stand for a few moments in silence to the memory of these consecrated Christian lives, after which the president will call on someone to lead in a word of prayer.

The report of the Committee on Social Action was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL ACTION.

The Council for Social Action was born in June, 1934, when our Congregational Christian Churches, convened in General Council at Oberlin, Ohio, "stirred by the deep need of humanity for justice, security and spiritual freedom and growth, aware of the urgent demand within our churches for action to match our gospel, and clearly persuaded that the gospel of Jesus can be the solvent of social as of all other problems."

The problems that we face today are multitudinous and complex. From every side we hear cries of need and injustice to humanity. There are conflicts between societies and within societies which are detrimental to all.

We as Christians should obey Christ not only in our spiritual relationship, but in our whole life.

Your Committee on Social Action recommends that all Christians unite to promote freedom and peace, both national and international; to be Christian in our dealings with all humankind regardless of race, color, or creed; to pledge our help to the sick and needy, locally, nationally, and internationally; and seek to enlist followers for Christ through the local church program, home missions, and foreign missions.

We feel that the Christian influence should and can be felt in industry, economics agriculture, education, and government by the individual Christian living the principles that Iesus taught.

Inasmuch as we need action to match our gospel, we recommend that we all might become one as Christ prayed.

The report of the Committee on Foreign Missions was presented as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

We should feel a deep sense of obligation to our 335 missionaries laboring in fifteen foreign countries to teach, heal, preach, and through the example of their living to proclaim the glorious gospel of Christ. To them our churches have given a promise of continued support in prayers, gifts, and interest. Do we want their number to grow and their work to increase? Our gifts through the past year indicates that we are travelling at about the same rate of speed without too much concern for the increased needs of the field. Let us remember that our mission dollar will by no means buy what it would ten years ago. If we give the same as we did then, it means that our effectiveness is cut about in half.

Opportunity abounds as it never has before in Africa, and the Philippines. The door in China has been closed, we know not for how long. Our work in India and Mexico faces grave problems which require great patience and tact. The missionaries on the fields, the area secretaries, the Prudential Committee of the American Board, are wrestling with these opportunities and problems, but ultimately the answer lies with the churches and their readiness to give. A basic budget has just been accepted by the American Board of \$1,669,919.00. However, a supplementary budget of \$50,000.00 was voted for a number of urgent requests from the field which could not be denied. The Board must find this money somewhere. It is an act of faith. Faith in us as members of Christ's Church, as followers of Jesus, that out of our great abundance we will have a little more concern for the world enterprise.

We do not have unlimited time with which to deal with the world's wounds. Other philosophies and ways of life are bidding for men's loyalties. Unless we labor with more diligence and give with a greater sense of sacrifice the doors in Africa, India, Japan, and the Philippines now so broadly open to us, will close as they have closed in China.

The great missionary movement of our churches has too long been delegated to women. Let Christian laymen rise to the challenge and concern themselves with broad strategy for Christ. If this should be, the missionaries would not only take heart, but the local church would feel new life and catch a renewed vision.

- 7. That the fiscal year of the treasurer of the North Carolina and Virginia Conference begin on November 1st and end with the close of October 31st, and that the churches of the Conference be requested to pay their apportionments to the Conference Fund not later than October 31st of each year.
- 8. That for the purposes of publishing in the ANNUAL the report of the Conference treasurer for the fiscal year, that report be adjusted to show receipts up to adjournment of the annual meeting of the Conference.
- 9. That the Committee on Finance of the North Carolina and Virginia Conference be appointed in advance of the annual meeting of the Conference, and that the members of the committee be notified of such appointment so that they may be better prepared to discharge their duties at the annual meeting.

Minutes of the Fortieth Annual Session of THE EASTERN VIRGINIA WOMAN'S MISSIONARY CONFERENCE

CHRISTIAN TEMPLE, NORFOLK, VIRGINIA OCTOBER 2, 1952

MORNING SESSION.

The Eastern Virginia Woman's Conference of Congregational Christian Churches met in its fortieth annual session in the Christian Temple, Norfolk, Virginia, October 2, 1952. The meeting was called to order at 10:00 A. M. by the President, Mrs. Garland Spratley.

Mrs. Spratley announced the theme, "Building With Love and Gratitude" and gave the Call to Worship. The President's Message was as follows:

THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.

Our themes for the past few years follow one another as though planned to show progress in Christian living: And Thy Neighbor, Opening Doors, Horizons Unlimited, We Dedicated Ourselves, Thy Will To Do, A Highway for Our God, and now, Building—With Love and Gratitude.

The reports for the year indicate growth among the women of the Eastern Virginia Woman's Missionary Conference. As we have journeyed along the King's Highway we have found that the paths of service have extended into every area of human life, with the individual, with the family, with those in physical and spiritual need, whether they be near or far.

The regular Executive Board meetings have been held with a prepared agenda for each meeting. Each member of the Board was requested to send an article to the editor of the Woman's Page of *The Christian Sun*, pertaining to the work of her committee, a week being designated for the publication of the article.

The programs for the thirty-second annual spring district meetings were well planned and rendered with enthusiasm. I think the most outstanding feature of the past year was the Mission Institute held in Suffolk, with Dr. Truman Douglass reviewing his book, "Mission to America" to nearly four hundred women.

I served as a member of the program committee for the Elon School of Missions, which was held in July with 46 women of Eastern Virginia enrolled. The annual conference was held at the Christian Temple, Norfolk, with forty churches represented and about three hundred and fifty present. The theme was "Building—With Love and Gratitude." Mrs. J. F. Morgan conducted the worship service and Dr. W. W. Sloan of Elon College related some of his experiences on his recent trip to Africa.

I was happy to have the privilege of attending the service of Worship and Dedication of the National Fellowship of Congregational Christian women at the Biennial Meeting of the General Council in Claremont, California on June 28th, when Mrs. W. B. Williams, president of the women of the Southern Convention presented our gifts for dedication.

God has been bounteous in His blessings and as stewards of His bounty, with love and gratitude, may we humbly rededicate ourselves to spend our time, our talent, and our treasure to the building of His Kingdom upon this earth.

"Where once the twisting trail in darkness wound Let marching feet and joyous song resound." Mrs. J. F. Morgan led the Service of Devotion, speaking on the theme: "The House We Are Building."

The Roll Call of Churches showed the attendance to be 337 women, ministers and visitors present.

Mrs. Spratley recognized the following persons: Dr. Millard Stevens, President, S. C. C.; Dr. Wm. T. Scott, Dr. L. E. Smith, Dr. J. G. Truitt, Miss Pattie Coghill, Mrs. W. B. Williams, Dr. W. W. Sloan, Dr. Jesse Dollar, Rev. R. E. Brittle (chosen as the outstanding rural pastor for 1951-52 by the V. P. I. Rural Pastor's Institute), and all former presidents of the Woman's Conference who were present.

Mrs. Spratley thanked the members of the Program Committee and all their helpers who compiled the program booklets.

WAVERLY DISTRICT.

During the past year the women of the Waverly District have received great inspiration from working together as a part of the Eastern Virginia Woman's Missionary Conference.

We have twelve churches in our district: Bethlehem (Dispt.), Barretts, Burton's Grove, Centerville, Dendron, Hopewell, New Lebanon, Richmond, Spring Hill, Union (Surry), Wakefield and Waverly. Seven churches report having a Woman's Missionary Society with 113 women enrolled.

Interest has been created and stimulated in missions through the use of good literature, visital aids and Bible Study.

Reports from the women's societies show that six societies used the program packet—five used the study books and five held the Bible Study. We have 47 subscribers to The Christian Sun; 9 to Guidepost; 12 to Advance; and 6 to Church Woman. One church owns visual aid equipment, three groups used convention equipment.

Friendly Service gifts have been sent from five societies to: Ryder Memorial Hospital, Franklin Center, India, Carroll County and The Christian Orphanage.

Four societies sent in Life Memberships to honor a member and help renovate rooms at Franklinton Center.

Christian Family Life Week was observed by five societies through programs, fellowship suppers and family picnics.

Two societies are active in local Council of Church Women. Six societies report observing World Day of Prayer with other denominations, five observed World Community Day and five May Fellowship Day.

Three churches have active Cradle Rolls, two of these contributed to missions through Woman's Conference Treasurer.

We have five children's groups and six young people's societies. Three children's groups and four young people's societies contributed to missions through Woman's Conference Treasurer.

Two young people attended Young People's Conference at Elon and six attended Junior-High Camp at Bayside.

Our district rally at Bethlehem near Disputanta on April 1 was a day of inspiration and fellowship with Miss Coghill and Mrs. W. B. Williams as speakers.

The challenge before the women of the Waverly District is great, we have a vision of greater works for our Master. Through prayerful planning and cooperation we know we can make these visions real.

SUFFOLK DISTRICT.

While traveling the highway of life this past year I chose as my guiding scripture for the year: "Trust in the Lord with all thine heart; Lean not unto thy own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge Him and He will direct thy path."

Now may we pause to consider what success we have had towards building a better highway for our God.

Each of the nineteen churches sent in detailed reports. Each has an organized missionary society with a combined membership of 945. Each presented a well planned devotional service for each meeting, held the Bible Study, used the packet and study books. All nineteen presented missions in a public program and held a Thank Offering program. The World Day of Prayer, World Community Day, and May Fellowship Day was observed by each Society. Seventeen societies observed National Family Week, with families attending church suppers and programs in local societies encouraging family devotion. Seventeen sent Friendly Service gifts. Twelve gave Life Memberships honoring twenty-six persons. Seven sent in Memorials in memory of nine loved ones. All societies paid their apportionment in full.

In the Suffelk District there are 385 subscriptions to *The Christian Sun*, 23 to *Advance*, 33 to *Guide Posts*, 15 to *Church Woman*, and fifteen societies have sent in news items to *The Christian Sun*. A total of 197 of our women attended the Fall Conference at Bethlehem Christian Church on October 4, 1951; 217 attended the Spring Rally at Windsor Christian Church, 31 attended the School of Missions. Five societies own visual aid equipment, another is purchasing a projector. But most all of the societies have the opportunity to view pictures either as guests of another church or by use of equipment in the community. Twelve societies attained all achievement goals.

There are 16 active Cradle Roll groups in the district, with a membership of 476. Fifteen of these groups had a Cradle Roll program and a party. Fourteen of our Children's groups have missionary education, 11 groups use the study books. There are 7 subscriptions to Children's Religion. Eight groups sent Friendly Service gifts.

We have 15 Young People's Societies, all of which use the packet and study books. Nine of these groups sent Friendly Service gifts. A total of 128 of our young people attended summer conferences or camps.

We were fortunate in having Mrs. F. C. Lester on February 8th at the Franklin Church to review, "We Americans North and South." Another highlight of the year was a visit from Dr. Truman Douglas on March 19th at the Suffolk Christian Church who spoke on "Mission to America." We were happy to have representatives from each District in Eastern Virginia on both of those occasions.

This has been a good year with 19 enthusiastic churches carrying out our Mission program. I am grateful for the opportunity to serve and for the cooperation in this undertaking, and now may we Build with Love and Gratitude for the ensuing year.

NORFOLK DISTRICT.

The Norfolk District has twelve churches and twelve active Missionary Societies with 534 women reported enrolled. There were 91 in attendance at the Fall Conference and 108 attended the Spring Rally. Fourteen were enrolled in the School of Missions.

Nine Societies reported a Thank Offering program. Each Society had a well-planned devotional program, 10 held their Bible Study and did the Mission studies. Ten Societies observed World Day of Prayer, 8 observed World Community Day, 9 had representatives at the May Fellowship Day and 8 were active in local Council of Church Women.

Subscriptions to *The Christian Sun* reported by the socities were 138, *Advance* 16, *Church Women* 4, *Guide Posts* 27. Seven Societies sent news items to *The Christian Sun*. Friendly Service gifts were reported to have been sent to both Community and Convention projects by ten Societies. The same number of societies had a Family Life Chairman and 9 Societies observed National Family Week.

Three churches own visual aid equipment and others had access to the use of local equipment. Six societies gave 10 Life Memberships and 8 societies gave 11 Memorials for a total of 21.

Nine active societies are reported for Young People. Seven used Young People's Packet and Study books and three sent Friendly Service Gifts. There were 31 in attendance at Summer Conference.

Among the Children's groups six reported having had missionary instruction in the Sunday School, six used the study books and materials provided by the Convention Superintendent. Three groups sent Friendly Service Gifts to places designated by the Convention. There were 17 subscriptions reported to Children's Religion.

Six Cradle Roll groups were reported with an enrollment of 124 children. Each group had a program and a party.

The Societies reaching the Goals of Achievement are: Bay View, Christian Temple, First (Portsmouth), Little Creek, Newport News, Second (Norfolk), Shelton Memorial and South Norfolk. Active Societies but not reaching all the Goals of Achievement are: Berea, Elm Avenue and First (Norfolk).

FRIENDLY SERVICE.

Friendly Service.

I believe "The Ryder Memorial Hospital" and "The Migrant Work" in Virginia came in first place as friendly service projects. But many remembered Franklinton Center and their great need there. Then there was Miss Olin Nicholson whom so many of you heard at the Rallies and we in Eastern Virginia heard in Richmond at the Young People's State Rally. Who could do so much with so little for the great need in India?

I want to bring to your attention again, "Coupons for the Orphanage." This is a continuing Project. If you haven't already appointed a "coupon chairman" do so immediately. All coupons are valuable no matter what the date. Save your coupons, and send them to Mrs. John G. Truitt, Elon Orphanage, Elon College, N. C.

The scope of our work continues to increase, and as new emergencies arise we

want to meet them in a friendly way.

Our new projects for the coming year will fit right into our two mission study themes. Miss Corrine Nordquist in Johannesburg, South Africa, is doing a won-

derful job in religious education and social work. We will want to remember her and her work later in the year. Each local group will have more information from Mrs. W. E. Wisseman, our Convention Chairman. But now we want to stress "Ellis Island," our home project. Because these gifts are to be collected and given in December so they can be mailed to Mrs. Jamie F. Pratt, Social Service, Ellis Island, New York 4, N. Y., by January 15, 1953. Mrs. Wisseman is planning a program for December which you will receive shortly.

Hope each church will support this project with Bags for Christmas gifts—16 in. x 16 in. and 24 in. x 24 in., each with a draw string in the top. They should be made of sturdy material, either of the traditional Christmas red or green, or of colorful designs. The main thing is that they be strong bags for many will probably use them in lieu of duffle bags or even suitcases.

Miss Pratt especially wants these bags filled with a toy, hard candy, crayons, color book and any other articles that you might think suitable for a small child.

FAMILY LIFE.

The Congregational Christian Commission on Christian Family Life has made great progress in the last five years, through the channels of the Women's Missionary Organizations and the use of the resources of the Division of Christian Education to reach the entire denomination.

In the program of many churches the focus of course is on the home. At all times in some measures, the church has been mindful of the home. The Christian Church and Christian home are partners in the religious nurture of growing persons. The Church is about the only institution in which all ages are welcome.

I am happy to report that there is evidence in the Eastern Virginia Conference of splendid progress in programs to strengthen and enrich Christian Family Life. Every church in Eastern Virginia with the exception of two, observed National Family Week. There is an increase of Family activities in the church: such as Family Festivals, Family Night, Family Camps, sponsored by the church, and Reading Table of Family Life materials. One church has "Literature Altar" instead of Literature Table. Another uses a cross and candles on the table, sometimes vested girls hand out materials. Some of our Sunday Schools use the Pilgrim Series, along with the material each quarter, there is a Family Book. The Family Book for the past quarter was "The Family Adventures," many homes took advantage of this splendid offer.

I am happy of the progreess we have made and am glad I could have a small part in the growth of this enterprise, the promotion of Christian Family Life. We still have much to do, and must broaden our program each year. Our first step each year is to talk with the minister and Church School Superintendent to see how, as a woman's society, we might cooperate in a complete program for our church.

My one suggestion for the coming year comes from the Program Manual of the Pilgrim Series and since this is the year of the completion of the Revised Standard Version of the Bible, the greatest Bible news in three hundred and forty-one years we are told. As a fall "All Church Program," have a Bible Exhibit and Family Night. Make it a program in which every family of the church may have a part.

VISUAL-AID.

As church women we are all concerned with making the outreach of our church more effective.

In order to reach this objective we use many methods. We teach; we hold institutes and conferences; and we plan many programs.

As we plan our work for the coming year, let us consider the audio-visual method of teaching. The picture projector and screen, the record player and recorder, the radio and television transmitter and receiver, all can be effectively used through scripturally based facts for teaching Christian beliefs to the unchurched and the indifferent, and provide opportunity for the churchman to understand more thoroughly his obligations in God's service.

I heartily recommend the purchase of a film-strip and slide projector as a sound investment. The faculty of the Liberty Spring Bible School, held during this past summer, were thrilled with the results obtained with the use of their new three-dimensional machine, especially with the Primary group.

Most churches have access to a movie projector through their high school, farm organization, or T. B. Association; so, let us try to give the membership of each church the opportunity of seeing our feature film of the year, "And More for Peace." This is an excellent film on stewardship, 45 minutes long, 16 mm. black and white, and can be secured from the Office of the Southern Convention, Elon College, N. C.

1. "Challenge of Africa"—A dramatic film document of the struggle between Communism and Christianity in Africa—16 mm. sound, 30 minutes. Rental, \$8.00.

INTERDENOMINATIONAL COOPERATION.

Reports of the year's Interdenominational Cooperation have been most encouraging. Everywhere women are recognizing that the world has become one great community, and to build a lasting peace we must joint hands and work together for the common end.

Thirty groups reported observing World Community Day. Their generous contributions helped to set up sewing centers for refugees in Central Europe. Blankets of all shapes and sizes were brought. These were sent to needy refugees in Korea, Palestine and Germany.

Next year our project, Packets for Peace will provide clothing for little children from infants to 6 years. This need is urgent. The offering will support the work of United Church Women for Peace.

This year:

- 1. Clothe a child.
- 2. Study that you may know how peace may be made a reality.
- Give—that the Christian women's action program for a lasting peace may advance more effectively in the year ahead.

World Day of Prayer was observed by 33 of the 35 groups reporting. On February 29th women of all creeds and colors united their petitions all around the world. Each year World Day of Prayer is more widely observed. Last year, in churches, schools, business houses and various other places all over the land prayers were offered.

CRADLE ROLL.

Train a child in the way he should go and when he is old he will not depart from it. I am sure that each of us realizes the importance of early Christian training. That is why the Cradle Roll plays such an important part in a child's life. The home and the church each share in this training; in other words, the foundation for the child's life is laid during his first six years, and these years are spent in the Cradle Roll.

Children learn by doing, and adapt themselves easily to their environment. It is easy to see then, that if they are exposed to Christian training at an early age, such training will become a part of their lives. Family worship, grace at neals, sharing with each other, and regular church attendance all will make a definite and good impression on the young child. Such deep-rooted attention to God and His wonders is not likely to leave even after many years.

The church helps in this training with their programs, their mite boxes, their parties for the young people. And in all these activities, the missionary importance

should be stressed, for even in such a small thing as a mite box, the child can learn that God loves children everywhere, that we are all His children, and that we must share our gifts.

Let us not look lightly upon the work of the Cradle Roll, for in it we face a grave responsibility to the young of our church. And this responsibility rests upon parents, teachers, superintendents, and upon every member of the church.

There are 29 Cradle Roll Societies in Eastern Virginia and 22 had Cradle Roll parties. Some societies used the suggested literature, while others used the Children's Religion, Bible Stories and pictures.

The offering this year amounted to \$440.29.

Frank—nineteen years, Helen Showalter Miller, Clarine Andes and Mrs. Howard T. Hensley. The following have served as treasure: Ivie Andes Frank, Miss Verdie Showalter-twenty years, Mrs. R. A. ommend that the officers of the C. M. A. be authorized to draw upon this fund during the year if an opportunity for the establishing of a new church should present itself, and such opportunity should seem promising to the officers of the C. M. A.

It is the conviction of the Plans Committee that the purpose of the C. M. A. should be reemphasized as that of establishing new churches and the assisting of needed churches in expanding their programs to meet the growing needs beyond their ability to pay for. We feel this should not include improvements to church grounds, parsonages, or normal building improvements.

A motion was made and seconded, that the Mission Committee, delegates and visitors in the Misson section discussion group petition the Valley Conference to put all available financial resources into starting a church in Harrisonburg, during 1953-54 conference year, and that the Conference request the Mission Board of the Southern Convention and our National Board of Home Missions to to share this undertaking in finances and leadership.

Motion carried that the petition be adopted and that the Executive Committee of Conference be instructed to further pursue and advance the project.

Conference adjourned for lunch.

WEDNESDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

Conference was called to order by the President.

Worship was conducted by Rev. E. J. Rohart.

Rev. Henry V. Harman explained the purpose and place of meeting of the following committees, namely: the Standing Committees of Conference, the Building and Loan Fund Committee, the Finance Committee and a meeting of the C. M. A. Officers.

Conference yielded to a meeting of the C. M. A. Rev. R. A. Whitten served as temporary chairman of the meeting, in the absence

of the president, Mrs A. W. Andes, due to sickness.

The total dues received by the C. M. A. was \$273.79.

Motion carried that the funds received by the C. M. A. be turned over to the treasurer of Conference and to be used for the mission work of Conference.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION AND LITERATURE

A meeting of members of the former, now combined, committees on Christian Education and Religious Literature together with officers of the Sunday School Convention was held at the Mayland Church, October 11, 1953 with Miss Pattie Lee Coghill, Convention Educational Secretary. As a result of this meeting, we recommend emphasis in the following areas:

1. Leadership Training: The Convention officers are available for leadership institutes in individual churches and in groups of churches. In several cases inter-denominational institutes have been tried and

found valuable.

2. Young adult work: Some of our churches are losing their young adults and young couples while others are finding new people coming into their area. We recommend that each church have a young adult group or Sunday School class.

3. Missionary Education: Miss Ione Patton will be in the Convention area early in the new year. The Sunday Schools, Youth Groups and Women's Missionary Societies would do well to sponsor Missionary

Education work.

- 4. College age Young People: A survey of Congregational Christian students in area colleges looking toward formation of United Student Fellowship groups and cooperation between students and local churches.
- 5. The teaching and the reading of the Bible: The Bible is the Word of God and our rule of faith and practice. We, therefore, recommend:

 (a) That more time and thought be given to reading the Bible.
- (b) That parents purchase Bible story books to read to their children.

 6. That every family subscribe to and read the *Christian Sun*. That each church appoint someone to send in subscriptions and renewals.

7. That Sunday Schools use our literature published by the Pilgrim Press.

Derrick Casper Golladay had been actively serving our churches in the Valley Conference throughout his long life as Sunday School teacher, leader of prayer, and lay preacher. He attended the Annual meetings of the Valley Conference for sixty-four years. He read the New Testament through about 670 times, and the Old Testament at least 36 times. He attended Elon College a couple of years. He helped to organize and lead several Sunday Schools. His life was an example of faithful Bible reading, and faithful service in the Church to the limit of his ability and inspiration. He passed on to his reward on the 23rd of April 1953, nearly 81 years of age.

In appreciation of the faithful life of D. G. Golladay, and missing his presence, the One Hundred and Fifth Annual Session of the Virginia Valley

We agree fully with the report of Race Problems that Dr. Robert Lee House made to the Southern Convention which is found on Page 51 of the 1952-53 annual.

We recommend:

ance and explain Jesus' teachings about human brotherhood, and correct erroneous views concerning Negroes.

1. That in our Sunday School we teach against prejudice and intoler-

- 2. We recommend that the Conference invite a speaker and fraternal fraternal delegates from the Convention of the South or Virginia Congregational Christian Conference to assist with a conference session in the near future.
- 3. We urge that our members go out of their way to multiply interracial acquaintances and friendships.
- 4. We urge our churches to throw their influences against discrimination. We should try to get employers to hire without regard to race, and workers to work with colored persons without protest.
- 5. We urge that every church elect a Social Action Committee.
- 6. We recommend that efforts be made in all our churches to interpret Social Problems and the work of the Council for Social Action. We suggest use be made of good Christian literature and of audio-visual aids on social problems.
- 7. We urge our members to work for a more Christian community through such organizations as P. T. A., Farm Bureau, Political Organizations and Labor Organizations.
- 8. We urge vigilance to see that our public schools do not teach non-Christian ideas.
- 9. We recommend that the members of our churches get acquainted with, and support the work of the Virginia Church Temperance Council, 311 W. Grace St., Richmond, Virginia, and the Rockingham Youth Temperance Council.

10. We recommend that our churches study World Peace and speak and work against war through all possible channels.

REPORT OF HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS COMMITTEE

The Home and Foreign Missions Committee met in joint session with the chairman of the Home Missions Committee in charge.

In response to the invitation of the president, quite a number of delegates and visitors sat in on the meeting. The chairman stated that this was a new procedure, and that the purpose of it was to give information and to create a greater interest in the mission cause.

Rev. R. A. Whitten was then called upon to lead in an open discussion of the various phases of the mission activity of the conference.

The delegates from the Mt. Lebanon church were called upon to give a report on the progress being made on their new church building. This they did, stating that the foundation was completed and that they had about \$4,000.00 in their building fund. The annual conference last year, upon the recommendation of the Home Missions Committee had appropriated \$500.000 on this project.

The question of establishing a Congregational Christian Church in Harrisonburg which had been under consideration at previous sessions of Conference was again introduced, and a motion was passed, that the Missions Committee Delegates and visitors in the Mission Section discussion group, petition the Valley Conference to put all available financial resources into starting a church in Harrisonburg, Virginia, during 1953-54 conference year and that the Conference request the Mission Board of the Southern Convention and the National Board of Home Missions, to share this undertaking in finances and leadership.

The Commission to Study the Alcoholic Beverage Control System Capitol Building

Richmond, Virginia

Honorable gentlemen:
The Plains District Ministerial Association of the Broadway-Timberville-New Market area is interested in the movement to revise the Virginia State A. B. C. system. We hold that the following revisions and changes are definitely needed:

1. That no A. B. C. license for the sale of 3.2 beer and/or other alcoholic beverages be granted when the majority of people in the trading area or community involved oppose the issuing of the license.

2. That provision be made for local option referendums whereby if the majority of those voting in a community vote against the sale of 3.2 beer and/or other alcoholic beverages, the A. B. C. licenses in that community be revoked or cancelled.

3. That the residents of a community be given full opportunity to express themselves regarding the desirability of alcoholic beverages in that community, and that the opinions of the majority of those residents expressing themselves be given primary consideration before an application for license can be granted.

4. That names of non-residents on applications and/or petitions for a license for alcoholic beverages sale be rejected.

5. That state-wide prohibition be established and enforced, and the State of Virginia go out of the alcoholic beverages business entirely.

We earnestly beg your prayerful consideration of these sug-

gestions.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Christian Education is not a term to be applied to one particular phase of Church Work. Rather, it is a program of mental, moral and spiritual development which should be continuous in its effect upon the lives of our church constitutencies. Only to this end can it be called Christian and educational.

Our generation has before it a tremendous challenge. The teachings of Christ are of value to none unless they are of value to everyone. They are not ways of belief for an exclusive few, but they comprise a "way of life" for all. Therein lies the challenge of our Churches in the field of Christian Education—reaching the unreached.

To this end your Committee would suggest:

1. That each Sunday School make a thorough survey of its opportunities and ascertain whether or not maximum results are being realized. Also, careful thought should be given to the materials used in the

Sunday School and in the parish.

2. Christian Education can be further advanced by Daily Vacation Bible Schools. Many publishing houses provide excellent materials for a ten-day school emphasizing particular themes for the development of Christian character. We would urge each Church, this year, to conduct such a School.

3. The training of teachers is an ever present need in our Churches. During the past year a week of Teacher Training Courses was offered in three areas of our Conference. However, not all Sunday Schools were represented. We would urge a 100 per cent support of these

schools in the coming year.

4. Commendation should be extended to the officers of the Sunday School Convention and to the Sunday School Superintendents of our Conference. We would commend the continuation of such a program and the full support of all Superintendents.

5. Acknowledging the need of continual training of our young people, we suggest that, if at all possible, each Sunday School have representatives at our Young People's Summer Conferences and that those receiving such training be used in the Christian Educational program

of the Church.

6. Elon College represents our greatest investment in Christian Education. Therefore, it merits our support, not only in the apportionment item and the Sustaining Fund, but in the Two and One-half Million Dollar Campaign. It is also deserving of our young people for training in higher education in Christian surroundings.

In the meantime, there is a deficit of \$408.00 in the Ministerial Education Fund between the report to conference in 1952 and this report of the transfer of assets in 1953.

Dr. John G. Truitt, Superintendent of the Christian Orphanage, reported on the accomplishments and needs of the orphanage.

The report of the Committee on Evangelism was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE EVANGELISTIC COMMITTEE OF THE EASTERN VIRGINIA CONFERENCE

The Evangelistic Committee has functioned during the year as progressively as the ministers and churches have allowed. In February they conducted three Evangelistic Rallies: one for the Suffolk area at Bethlehem; one for the Waverly area at Wakefield; and one for the Norfolk area at South Norfolk. Sixteen churches participated in these Rallies.

Of the twenty six churches reporting to the Committee, eight pastor's classes were held, eighteen revivals conducted, and four evangelistic campaigns launched by organized laymen. Four hundred thirteen members were received: one hundred seventy-eight by profession of faith and two-

hundred thirty-five by transfer of letter.

The Committee feels that some progress has been made in the field of evangelism, but at the same time we still are falling far short of what God

expects in soul winning.

The Committee recommends that more churches conduct pastor's classes and more organized personal evangelistic campaigns by organized laymen. We urge that the ministers and churches cooperate more effectively with the Evangelistic Committee in carrying out the program set up by the Convention.

The report of the Eastern Virgnia Laymen's Fellowship was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE EASTERN VIRGINIA LAYMEN'S FELLOWSHIP

In both interest and influence it is felt that the work of the Laymen's Fellowship of the Eastern Virginia Conference has improved.

One major emphasis has been on doing something to encourage and promote a more general and active interest and participation of Laymen

in their LOCAL church.

The attendance at our Bi-annual meetings has been large. The number of churches represented has increased. Mutual interest and participation in our programs, by both the Laymen and the Pastors, has been most gratifying. It is sincerely hoped, however, that we may soon have a participation which comes much nearer 100 per cent.

In keeping with the decision of the Executive Board and the expressed wishes of the Laymen assembled, the two-meetings-a-year plan has been

followed.

The Newport News Church Laymen were hosts at our 1952 Fall Rally. Everyone was warmly welcomed, and that promised "out of this world" food was much in evidence.

For the afternoon session the Executive Committee had planned a Dis-

cussion-group meeting. Topics for discussion were:

1. How may we effect a more satisfactory adult grouping and promotion in our Sunday Schools? Led by C. F. Savage, Bethlehem Chistian Church.

Too few people of the community are members of, or active in, the church. What can Laymen do about this? Led by J. Vaughan Beal,

Franklin Christian Church.

3. What are some of the specific jobs for Laymen? a. Local level? b. Conference level? c. Convention level?—Led by George Cornell, Berea (Nansemond) Christian Church.

4. What place should the Church have in the community?—Led by Nor-

man Schlagel, Congregational Christian Temple.

5. Among how many officials or official bodies should the work of the church be divided, and what are the duties of each?-Led by John Halsted, Rosemont Christian Church.

There seemed to be only one serious regret—time was just too limited to take care of all the animated interest and desire for participation shown. Nevertheless, most members of each discussion group seemed to have been pleased with and profited by their experiences. A similar program is being planned for our 1953 Fall Rally to be held at Berea, Great Bridge, November 15th.

After the delicious dinner, and a much enjoyed Preachers' quartet, Dr. H. S. Hardcastle couched more in a few words than many could have done with a month of talking. His short address was superb. One layman who had driven 30 miles to reach Newport News remarked, "That address alone

would have made the meeting worthwhile."

Again our Spring Rally was held at Planters' Club. The fun and fellowship at this meeting were most wholesome. The Worship Service led by Rev. H. E. Crutchfield was inspiring. Past President Mills E. Godwin, Jr. gave an interesting talk on Moonelon.

After a most ample and delicious dinner, the group was entertained, instructed and inspired by an address made by Rev. Ernest Emurian. That address will not soon be forgotten by many who were privileged to hear it.

At both Fall and Spring Rallies, Special numbers and the group singing led by W. H. Baker, "The Faithful," added spice to the programs.

Laymen in most of our churches seem to be growing increasingly interested in their opportunity and responsibility as churchmen, locally and Conference-Convention wide. With better organization and a more general appreciation among our churches of the part men can, and should play in the work of the Church, the Laymen's Fellowship will become a power for God and good among men.

Our churches are urged to join the increasing number of churches observing Layman's Sunday. By so doing the work of the Laymen's Fellowship will be much enhanced and every church profited. Eastern Virginia Laymen, plan now to attend the Fall Rally at Berea, Great Bridge, Nov. 15th.

The report of the Committee on Home Missions was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS

Your committee wishes to report that it has carefully considered all matters brought to its attention and the several requests for financial help from our churches in the Eastern Virginia Conference.

We now recommend to the Conference that there be appropriated from

our Home Mission Funds:

1. The sum of \$300.00 to the Second Congregational Christian Church of Norfolk to be applied on their parsonage debt;

2. The sum of \$300.00 to the Elm Avenue Congregational Christian

Church of Portsmouth to be applied on Pastor's salary.

3. And the sum of \$1,200.00 to the Bay View Congregational Christian Church of Norfolk preferably to help them with their efforst to pur-

chase a church parsonage.

This committee feels that in each of the above mentioned churches there is a vital and pressing need for the funds allocated and that they will materially help these churches to do a greater work in their respective communities. The members of this committee feel that these churches are making a real effort to meet the opportunities before them. We earnestly believe that they deserve our prayers and are entitled to our help. Our wish is we could do more. The fields appear to be ripened unto the harvest and

may we, to whom much has been given, share gladly with those that need our help.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the delegates of the Eastern Virginia Conference of Congregational Christian Churches in annual session assembled, at Newport News, Virginia, on the 28th day of October, 1953.

First: That the trustees of the Eastern Virginia Conference are directed on behalf of this Conference and/or the Trustees and members of the Hobson Christian Church, to petition the Circuit Court of Nansemond County, Virginia for authority to sell, for a fair and reasonable price, at public or private sale, the real estate, with the buildings and improvements thereon, known as the Hobson Christian Church property, in Hobson, Nansemond County, Virginia.

Second: That the Trustees of this Conference, after selling the said property pursuant to order of the Court, shall collect, in cash, the purchase price thereof and pay same to the Treasurer of this Conference to be deposited in the general fund of said Conference.

The president reported that the Executive Committee had entered into a tentative agreement to sell the Hobson church building, the furnishings not included, for one thousand dollars.

On motion it was voted that the action of the Executive Committee be authorized in the event the court grants permission for the sale of the property.

The report of the Committee on Religious Literature was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

"Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed." 2 Timothy 2:15.

Enlightenment has ever been synomous with the written word. The great Reformation of 400 years ago came because the Bible was made available to the common people. The masterpiece of literature and sourcebook of inspiration and guidance is the basis of all good reading.

Christian literature is "the powerful right arm of evangelism" and might well be the means of achieving Protestant unity. The Christian book store is wielding an increasing influence in breaking down prejudice and introducing Christian truth. However, it is of primary importance that we know the author and his convictions.

One of the highlights of the past year was the publication of the Revised Standard Version of the Bible. This version, marked with clarity and insight, enables the reader to understand many of the passages which heretofore were clouded and obscured by the use of archaic terminology. We recommend the use of this version by our people.

We further recommend the revival of daily Bible reading in the home. It is generally conceded that "the nature of a person's religion has been set in many cases by the time the child is seven." Those early years in the home and Sunday School echo all through adult life. We can be ambassadors of Christ to the children in our homes.

We strongly urge the use of Sunday School materials which are published by our Pilgrim Press. Many of our churches do not use them because they can buy less expensive materials. But we always get what we pay for Certainly we should be concerned with giving our people the best materials available. And our Pilgrim Press has them. There is the further objection voiced that the Pilgrim Materials require more work on the part of the teacher. And they do. But let us remind our people that the teacher has

a great privilege and a great responsibility in teaching. Therefore, she

should be willing to give of her best to her task.

It should be our purpose to stimulate interest in "The Christian Sun." which, since 1844, has inspired deeper unity among the churches and homes of our Conferences and Conventions. This last remaining weekly publication in our denomination provides an added means for our Christian witness. We recommend that each church endeavor to increase its subscriptions striving to place The Christian Sun in every home. We further urge all new members received into the church be given an introductory copy.

We also recommend the following religious magazines: Advance, which presents dynamically the work of our denomination at home and abroad; The Pilgrim Highroad and Children's Religion, which are unexcelled for Young People and Juniors, and The Christian Herald, which contains an excellent review of religious literature and other vital religious matter.

There are new ways of taking the message by picture and radio, which provide rich and varied means of reaching the hearts of men. The effective presentation of Christ today will depend upon the use of every possible method. We therefore recommend that in each church an Audio-Visual Committee be appointed to stimulate Bible study in all age groups, and to demonstrate the teaching power of pictures for the building of God's Kingdom.

"What is in thy hand?" These words spoken to Moses come to us as a divine call. In our hand are ways and means, methods and techniques, amazing and revolutionary, placed there by God. Guided by his Spirit in their use, we also may work miracles in bringing the world to Christ." Respectfully submitted: Mrs. A. C. Moore, Rev. W. P. Smith, Rev. R. C.

The report of the Eastern Virginia Sunday School Convention was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION

The Eighty-fourth annual session of the Eastern Virginia Sunday School Convention of the Eastern Virginia Conference of Congregational Christian Churches was held at the Oakland Congregational Christian Church, Chuckatuck, Virginia, on July 21, 1953. Attendance was very good with a high degree of inspiration and interest being evidenced.

A special feature of the morning session was an able and inspirational address by Dr. Jesse H. Dollar, President of our Eastern Virginia Conference. He especially stressed the place and importance of the Sunday School in our Church program, the subject of his address being "The Sunday School, A Means To An End." The worship service given by the young people of Union Southampton Church and the devotional period by the young people of the Windsor Church were outstanding examples of what our young people are doing and can do. At the afternoon session with our Vice-President, Rev. H. E. Crutchfield, as convener, we had a panel discussion on the subjects: "The Adult Teacher"; Youth in the Sunday School"; "Children's Work in the Sunday School"; "Points on Teaching in the Sunday School"; day School." Each of these subjects was presented by a recognized leader from several of our Sunday Schools.

Total receipts for the Convention were \$1.077.85.

\$900.00 was authorized to be given to the Board of Christian Education,

representing an increase of \$150.00 over the previous year.

Officers elected for the new year were: J. Letcher Eley, president; Rev. H. E. Crutchfield, vice-president; W. H. Baker, secretary; Miss Mary Lee

The 1954 session will be held on Tuesday after the third Sunday in July at the Franklin Congregational Christian Church, Franklin, Virginia. Respectfully submitted: J. Letcher Eley, President.

Rev. Ellis N. Clark, the representative of this Conference to the Virginia Church Temperance Council, spoke of the work of this

organization.

On motion it was voted that the Finance Committee be directed to give serious consideration to the possibility of making an appropriation of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) to the Virginia Church

Temperance Council.

Rev. J. E. Neese, pastor of the Second Congregational Christian Church, Norfolk, Virginia, presented a petition to the conference on behalf of the church asking that permisson be granted to change its name to "Central Congregational Christian Church" effective the beginning of the Conference year 1953-54 and the in-coming fiscal year.

On motion it was voted that permission be granted.

Rev. Ellis N. Clark informed the conference that the historical marker at the site of the old Lebanon Church in Surry County needs attention.

On moton it was voted that the Executive Committee be given

authority to take whatever steps seem necessary.

The afternoon session adjourned after the benediction by Rev. W. P. Smith.

WEDNESDAY—NIGHT SESSION

The worship service was conducted by Rev. A. Lanson Granger, Jr., pastor of the Newport News Congregational Christian Church, assisted by the choir of the church.

The service of licensure for Reuben Askew was conducted by Dr. H. S. Hardcastle. Dr. W. T. Scott and Dr. I. W. Johnson assisted

in the service.

The report of the Committee on Foreign Missions was presented.

Miss Alice M. Huggins, American Board Missionary to China, addressed the conference on her work and experiences in China.

The service of Holy Communion was conducted by Rev. Clyde L. Fields and Rev. Allen L. Hurdle, assisted by the Deacons of the Newport News Congregational Christan Church.

THURSDAY—MORNING SESSION

The conference was called to order at 9:30 a.m. by President Jesse H. Dollar. Rev. Thomas H. Britton led the opening hymn and Rev. Harvey L. Carnes the prayer.

The report of the Committee on Foreign Missions was adopted

as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

The foreword to the "Blue Book" prepared for the Mid-Winter Meeting of the Congregational Christian Churches which were held in Cleveland, Ohio in January 1953 carries in part the following statement by Dr. Truman Douglas:

"The Missionary task is a continual reminder to the churches that they have not listened attentively to their Lord unless they have heard his call to go out into the world. They are always being threatened with the deafness of introversion. The congregation which is mainly preoccupied with its own comfort, prosperity, and the enjoyment of its inner fellowship has obviously forgotten why it exists. It has surrendered its reason for being and its title to be called a church if it has ceased to hear its Lord's summons to be an instrument for the redemption of the world. . . . The missionary enterprise tests the adequacy of the church's hearing. Is it listening to the Gospel in its wholeness?"

The time once was when our world almost ended at our own front doors, but with the modern day modes of transportation, radio and television the world is now at our front door. Since the needs of the world are so vividly brought to our attention how can a church be content to see only its own needs and not hear the whole call of the gospel? The Master commanded his disciples to go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature.

The members of the Congregational Christian Churches can be proud of the work they are doing through our American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions. The Board was founded in 1810 "for the purpose of propagating the gospel in foreign lands by supporting missionaries, by diffusing a knowledge of the Holy Scriptures, and by maintaining appropriate Christian activities and institutions."

Statistics show that through our American Board, our churches have missions today in 14 countries: France, Greece, Turkey, Lebanon, Syria, Angola (Portuguest West Africa), Southern Rhodesia, South Africa, India, Ceylon, Japan, Philippines, Micronesia and Mexico. The most important part of our work on the foreign field is our organized churches, which number 2173, with a total of 540,000 in the Christian Community.

We have about 350 missionaries. In addition, we have more than 10,000 leaders in overseas churches and mission centers. The training of these

national leaders is our most important emphasis.

Along with the churches, we support the following other institutions: 899 schools, including collegiate and theological types, and many elementary, high, and vocational schools; 22 hospitals, 32 dispensaries, treating annually about 250,0000 patients; 21 social centers serving daily more than 1,200 people.

While the statistics show that we have about 350 missionaries on the foreign field and about 10,000 national leaders, still these are not near enough workers—even as our budget is never sufficient. The American Board is seeking committed Christian men and women for unique overseas

opportunities in the various countries in which we work.

From information in the hands of your committee it would appear that one church in our Eastern Virginia Conference directly supports a foreign mission project of its own—the Betty Gibson Bible Class of the Rosemont Church helps support a Bible Woman in India. All the churches in our Conference contribute to the general fund of foreign missions. For this we are grateful.

Our Missionary Education theme for 1953-54 is "The Life and Task of the Church Around the World." Ourtask is three-fold: To achieve Christian life and work in our own local church; to see that work as only partial when it is local, and to be completed only in relation to the entire commu-

nity, the nation, and the world.

When Jesus gave the command to the disciples to go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature he gave them their task! "Until every man is won for Christ, this task is a challenge to very Christian." Respectfully submitted: Mrs. Russell T. Bradford, Rev. E. T. Farrell, Mrs.

The report of the Eastern Virginia Woman's Missionary Conference was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE EASTERN VIRGINIA MISSIONARY CONFERENCE

The Forty-first annual session of the Eastern Virginia Woman's Missionary Conference was held on Thursday, October 1, 1953 at ten o'clock in the Franklin Congregational Christian Church. The theme for the day was "The Life and Task of the Church Around the World." It was a lovely day and the church was filled to overflowing with representatives from forty-two churches in our conference.

Very encouraging reports were given as Mrs. G. C. Brittle told of the work in the Waverly District, Mrs. Ray Gordon spoke of the activities in the Suffolk District and Mrs. L. W. Vaughan read the report of Mrs. J. E. Neese, superintendent of the Norfolk District The reports of the depart-

ments and committees indicated the work is progressing.

Mrs. W. B. Williams, president of the Woman's Missionary Convention, presented the Thank Offering project, which will be our Mission on Mindanao. The Reverend Quentin Leisher, of Boston, Mass., a special representative of the American Board of Foreign Missions, used for his topic, "Our Task Around the World." Mr. Shepherd Johnson of Franklin sang as a solo, "My Task," and Mrs. Harvey L. Carnes sang "Great Peace Have They Which Love the Lord" during the afternoon session. Mrs. William T. Scott, president of the North Carolina Woman's Missionary Conference, gave a most interesting account of her trip to the International Council, S. Andrew's, Scotland.

Mrs. George Cornell, the treasurer, reported our giving amounted to \$10,271.96, of which \$1,857.45 was our Thank Offering for our Carroll County Mission The amount contributed for Life Memberships and Memorials was

\$720.00 which will continue to go for Franklington Center.

The officers for 1953-1954 were installed by Miss Pattie Lee Coghill, Educational Secretary of the Southern Convention: president, Mrs. Garland Spratley; vice-president and Friendly Service, Mrs. Ray Gordon; secretary, Mrs. H. The report of the Committee on Social Action was presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL ACTION
A famed preacher of a former generation, Dr. Charles H. Parkhurst, in his Lyman Beecher lectures declared, "We ought to work to redeem this world, not merely to populate the next." Our Lord taught us, in words which we repeat in our churches almost every Sunday, to pray: "Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth. . . ." The faith which we proclaim is dom come, Thy will be done on earth.... The faith which we proclaim is not only that "Christ loved me, and gave Himself for me," but also that "God so loved the world." "God was in Christ," says Paul, "reconciling the world to Himself . . entrusting to us the ministry of reconciliation."

The plain implication of all these statements seems to be that God is concerned not just to save men out of the world, but to save the world. He concerned to redeem our world in the totality of its life and all its human

purposes to redeem our world in the totality of its life and all its human

relationships.

As individual Christians and as churches we can never allow ourselves to forget therefore that our's is a social gospel as well as a personal gospel. Which is to say that like our Lord, we must care about and be concerned with all the influences which affect and shape the character and personality of persons. The gospel is not just for a segment of life, not for the inner

life alone, but is directed upon and is relevant to all our human relations. With these thoughts as the premise of our faith, the Committee on Social Action wishes to submit to this conference he following considera-

tions and recommendations:

1. We recommend that larger place be given within the program of our churches to the study of the relation of the Christian faith to our common life Some of our churches may find it wise to set up a Committee on Study and Social Action; others may wish to work through an already existing committee, board or organization. The Council for Social Action, 289 Fourth Avenue, New York 10, New York, will be glad to furnish materials as stimulus and guide, and we suggest that our churches write to the Council for their help.

2. In view of the cases pending before the Supreme Court dealing with segregation in the public schools, we urge our people to maintain an open mind in the matter until the Court has reached a decision, and that within our churches we seek in every way possible to assure that whatever decision the Court may hand down shall be accepted. To this end, we recommend that our churches make provision in their program to consider the question of segregation and the schools, and to prepare their own members and the community for the deci-

sion of the Court.

3. It has come to the attention of this Committee that there are a number of hotels and resorts within the state and in our area which practice discrimination against Jews. In at least one instance, a hotel is advertised as "catering exclusively to Christians." We believe that most of our people resent this use of our faith in an attempt to justify a practice whic his wholly unChristian, that it is a means of promoting religious and racial intolerance which should not be tolerated, that it represents an attitude more in line with Fascism and Communis mthan with our way of life. We therefore urge the people of our churches to let their opposition be known to this policy of discrimination wherever and whenever they may encounter it.

4. We recommend that our churches keep informed on the results of the studies being made by the special commission set up by the

Governor of the State into the policies and practices of the Alco-

holic Beverage Control.

5. We believe that the churches of our conference have a great opportunity to help relocate within our area refugees who will be coming to the United States as result of recently enacted legislation. We recommend hat as many of our churches as will lay this matter upon their hearts, study it, and endeavor to locate one or more families in their community.

cial assistance to this project.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM

John R. Mott, one of the world's greatest Christian statesmen, once said, "The world is waiting for the witness of the people called Christians." This is just as true today as ever. We as children of God should take this statement seriously. It is not more religion that the world needs today. There is plenty of religion. The greatest need is not a revival of religion, but a revival of Christianity. If we are to have this revival we must engage in a "fiery" evangelism. The supreme business or task of Christianity, the Church, is the saving of the lost. There are many activities going on in the church today; but how many of these activities are geared to the saving of the lost?

Someone has said, "The saving of souls will save our souls, the souls of our churches." Fiery evangelism can save the church. It will have us professing Christians from a life of futility. We need an evangelism that will prove to be a throbbing heart that will pump life blood into the spiritual body of the Church. There is nothing that can do more to unite the hearts and minds of God's people.

How can we have such a revival? It must come from men and women who go about their work putting God in what they do, men and women who believe in prayer, men and women who want to make God real to humanity. May God fill our churches with such. Let us pray that God may

help us all to make soul-winning the very heart and soul of our work and witness in a civilization that is on trial right now.

Dwight L. Moody used to say, "The best way to revive the church is to build a fire in the pulpit." The minister knows how easy it is to let the fire burn down to cold ashes in the pulpit. The laymen in our churches can make or unmake the man in the pulpit. May God give us ministers, laymen, laywomen, young people and children with a burning desire for the salvation of the lost.

Therefore, we your committee make the following recommendations:

1. That our pastors be more evangelistic throughout the year.

That we stress evangelism in every way possible, using every method we know, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

3. That we call upon our Sunday School officers, teachers, and lay leaders to proclaim the Gospel of repentance and confession of sin and the mercy and the forgiveness of God.

4. That we call upon all our people to pray earnestly for a mighty re-

vival in our midst.

5. That a special season be set aside in each church sometime during the year for a definite spiritual awakening.

The report on Religious Literature prepared by Mrs. Carl Wallace was read by the secretary as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

Wise people for ages past have recognized that we are greatly influenced by what we read. In the average church today where little else is read religiously except the literature of the local church school, one can readily see the importance of the kind of literature used. Many advantages are seen for our schools which use the materials of our own Pilgrim Press. The members of these schools are taught an awareness and an understanding of the Congregational Christian Church. This literature finds a place for teaching missions, social relations and other phases of Christian Living not often mentioned by non-denominational publishing companies having lesser obligations in these broader fields. Also, the language and thoughts of our own literature are more akin, in most cases, to the preaching heard from our pulpits. This makes for a more satisfying church relationship. Observation reveals that more and more of our churches are realizing these needs and are changing to the Pilgrim Press Literature.

The Christian Sun continues to shine its rays of warmth on our E. N. C. Conference. Our goal for subscriptions is 1,377 and to date we have fallen far short of this mark. Remember this is our paper and our means of organizational contact one with the other. We need the "Sun" and the "Sun" needs us.

There are many sources of information as to good religious literature and books. The pastor should always have a ready list for interested members. A reminder is made here, however, of the religious section of your local library and the section of the Pilgrim Press Catalogue marked "Books."

In consideration of the above report this Committee recommends:

1. That each church strive towards the use of our own denominational literature in every department of training in the local program.

2. That the subscription quota for the Christian Sun be seriously accepted by each church and definite plans made as to responsibility and actions for accomplishing this goal.

The report for the committee on Stewardship was presented by the chairman, Rev. Clay Farrell:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP

"Christian Stewardship is the systematic giving of time, abilities and material possessions based on the conviction that these are a trust from God to be used in His service for the benefit of all mankind." (Stewardship Council).

From the teaching of the Scripture it is clear that Bible Stewardship means at least three things: (1) The acknowledgement of God's ownership of all things; (2) The acceptance of what we are and have as a trust from God; (3) The administration of the same according to the will of God.

The church has nothing to sell. Our relationship to God and His Church is not that of buyer and seller—it is that more blessed one of giver and receiver. "God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son; Christ loved us and gave Himself for us; Thanks be to God for His unspeakable gift; freely ye have received, so freely shall ye give."

Many political and religious leaders of today are declaring that the only hope for civilization is in a change of heart upon the part of men and nations. We believe that only the Lord Jesus Christ is able to bring about this change of heart, and that it is up to those of us who know Him as Personal Saviour, to make Him known to the world. To do this we should renew our efforts to enlist all our people in the stewardship of personality, powers, and possessions.

We believe that men without Christ are lost, and can be saved only by the grace of God through faith in Jesus Christ. Therefore the first and most important work of the church today, is preaching the Gospel of Christ which is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth. Our Lord Jesus taught that one soul is of more value than all the material things of the world. "For what is a man profited if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul. . . ." Matt. 16:26.

Christian Stewardship in its deeper meaning will give us a new sense of values, and will transform the Church, now largely static, into a Church dynamic. If we are to have stewardship churches we must have stewardship pastors, and a stewardship program for the local church. Therefore we are asking our ministers to accept, practice, preach, teach, and promote Christian Stewardship in their churches.

Your Stewardship Committee met in Fuquay Springs in May. At this meeting it was decided to send a letter to every church in the Conference, recommending a program of finance for this year. We have received very few reports from this letter. We wish to recommend the following:

- 1. That a stewardship institute for ministers and lay leaders be held some time during the year, those attending to conduct a similar institute in their local church.
- 2. That every church have a budget, which would include the church's entire financial plans for the coming year; and that every member be furnished a copy in order that he may be better informed as to the money expended by his church.

3. That every church elect a finance committee (consisting of three to five members) whose duty is to prepare a church budget that will meet the needs of the church at home and abroad, and to present this to the church for appropriate the church at home and abroad, and to present

this to the church for approval.

4. As a church makes financial plans, so the individual ought to make plans. Therefore, we recommend that every member be given the opportunity to indicate how much he plans to give to the church during the coming year. Such an opportunity may be given during a loyalty service held near the end of the church year. Members not present at this service may be given the same opportunity by lay

visitation the same day if possible. Rural churches may use the LORD'S ACRE plan in connection with the above, if so desired.

W. C. FARRELL, Chairman T. N. DAUGHTRY CARY POWELL, JR.

Rev. Fred Register made a report of a Stewardship Institute conducted by Dr. Warren Dennison in the Wake Chapel Church.

Rev. Carl Wallace read the following report on Christian Edu-

cation:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The effectiveness of Christian Education is dependent upon at least three conditions: Buildings, Leadership, and Spirit. The Eastern North Carolina Conference has shown some activity in these three areas during the past year. Many of our churches have either begun or completed class rooms or education plants allowing for closer grading of pupils and a more effective educational program. In March of this year the Superintendents and their assistants met in Durham for dinner and a training program. In July of this year the annual Sunday School Convention was held at Fuller's Chapel Church with 22 of our Schools represented. The theme for the day was, "Evangelism Through the Sunday Schools." In addition to the conference programs of training, some of the local churches have had extensive programs of teacher and officer training.

The Youth of our conference under the capable leadership of Miss Bettie Burt Hight have held quarterly rallies either by districts or as a

conference. These have been most informative and inspiring.

In consideration of the past year's program and with hope for a better year ahead this committee makes the following recommendations to the churches of the Eastern North Carolina Conference:

 That the leaders of the Sunday Schools be continuously reminded of the need for cooperation with the conference program of training. 2. That each church plans next year to include some phase of officer-

teacher training in its local program.

3. That each local church accept responsibility, by a definite plan, for

the youth program of the church.
4. That "College Day" be discreetly observed and a continuous emphasis throughout the year placed upon Elon College as our center

of higher education.

5. That due to the cloudy relationship between the Conference and the Sunday School Convention, this Conference consider the possibility of a motion that will automatically make the President of the Sunday School Convention either chairman of the Committee on Christian Education, if deemed capable, or at least a member of this Committee. (Note: This will subordinate the Sunday School Convention to the Conference and make for a more systematic organization of responsibilities in the work of Christian Education in our Conference. Thus the Committee on Christian Education, instead of the President of the Sunday School Convention, will be responsible for our program of education as a Conference. The Committee on Christian Education acting in this capacity will eliminate the need of a Sunday School Convention Planning Committee.)

W. L. WOOD K. M. LINDNER

The Committee on Social Action made the following report: (Rev. W. A. Grissom, chairman).

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL ACTION

Your committee on Social Action regretfully reports no real work accomplished through the Committee. This report then must be in the form of general suggestions in the field of Social Action. Your Committee does feel, however, that many of our Churches are becoming familiar with the term Social Action through their own efforts and farsightedness and should be commended. They are learning that this broad inclusive term speaks of the heart of the Christian Gospel which is not content only to learn the demands of our Lord but see them accepted only as they are lived

and put into practice in our lives and in our Churches.

We are called upon continually to give of our money, our time, our food and clothing that the needy people throughout the world might be fed and clothed. We need continually to face the question, shall we walk the path today in the spirit of the priest and Levite or bend down with the helping hand of the Good Samaritan? Can we feel guiltless that even as the cries for help come from suffering humanity across the sea, we are tearing down our barns to build bigger? Should we not hear the words of our Lord again as He said, "Not everyone that sayeth Lord, Lord, but he that doeth . . ."? The Church World Service of the National Council of Churches has tried to answer this call through CROP. We urge you to support this enterprise that it might be said of us: "I was hungry and you fed me."

There is a mounting tension and hysteria today over race relations. Especially is this true in the South with regards to our Negro brethren. It is urged that our Churches keep sane and calm on this question and seek to base our thoughts and actions on the principles of Christ. From a report of the General Council of 1948 I quote: "We recognize that our Churches and our society are involved in a racial division and injustices which are contrary to God's will. We will call our Churches to confess their own guilt, and to acknowledge their responsibility for renewed efforts toward the integration, in our Churches and in our society, of all persons on the basis of equality and mutual respect. Employment practices and real estate covenants that discriminate against people because of their race, creed, or national origin are problems which the Christian conscience cannot evade."

The Churches in America are bewildered in the midst of the growing ravages of alcoholic beverages. The use of intoxicating liquors is on the increase to an alarming degree. It gives us an uneasy conscience to know that alcoholics in America are increasing at the rate of more than 50,000 a year, and that problem drinkers are increasing more than 200,000 a year. Statistics prove that this great increase is in younger boys and girls of high school and college ages. It should give us no less uneasiness to know that the United States has a greater percentage of alcoholics than any other nation in the world. Here is a challenge to the Christian Church. The problem is a moral one, not political.

Social Action involves the whole of Christian living. The first and greatest commandment that we should love God with all our hearts is equaled only by one—that we love our neighbors as ourselves. He only is neighborly who shows mercy and kindness to those in need.

Rev. Carl Wallace made the following report on Home Missions:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS

The attention of the Home Mission Effort of this conference for the past year has been focused on the new Eutaw Community Church in Fayetteville, N. C. This is the first new church of the Eastern North Carolina Conference in many years. Under the wise leadership of Dr. F. C. Lester this group has been able to complete the first unit of a proposed campustype church and plans are now made for an extensive growing campaign. Much of the optimism and hope held by our Conference for this new church has been made possible because of the help of the National and

Local Home Mission Boards, the Church Building and Loan Fund, and the Conference Missionary Association.

Lee's Chapel Church has also attracted much attention on the home front by the completion of a new church building made possible by a loan from the Church Building and Loan Fund.

The Southern Pines Church has just completed a beautiful, modern educational plant also made possible partly through Home Missions and the Church Building and Loan Fund.

Other churches in our Eastern North Carolina Conference have made much progress and even though they received no help from any organized home mission program outside the local church, their efforts should be acknowledged as home mission work.

Realizing that the Church Building and Loan Fund has played a dominant role in our Home Mission Program for the past year, we of this committee do duly recognize the 19 churches of our Conference who have subscribed to their quota of this home mission endeavor.

Recognition is also made of the 14 churches of our Conference who contributed to Elon College through the Sustaining Fund as recorded in the last annual report. This too is a part of our larger home mission obligation.

In consideration of the above report this committee recommends for the coming year that:

1. All churches in the Eastern North Carolina Confeernce accept as a minimum goal the complete payment of all apportionments.

2. All churches, not having already accepted their quota for the Church Building and Loan Fund, accept this privilege as soon as possible.

3. All churches, not already doing so, strive to help Elon College through the Sustaining Fund and by encouragement of personal gifts to this most worthy enterprise.

4. This conference give serious consideration to the plan of combining the office of president of the Conference Missionary Association and the Chairmanship of the Committee on Home Missions in an effort to consolidate conference home mission information and activity.

5. All church members of this conference be conscientiously concerned and pray for home mission work for the coming year and especially for our new church in Fayetteville.

CARL WALLACE E. M. CARTER W. L. PARKER

I. H. Vickery presented a report on the local progress of the Church Building and Loan Fund in the Conference. Martin Gerren spoke on the "Building and Loan Fund Across the Nation." Rev. Fred Register spoke on "Our Opportunity."

The closing prayer for the morning was given by Rev. E. M. Carter, after which the conference adjourned for lunch.

The afternoon session of the conference was called to order by the president at 2 P. M. After a hymn and prayer by Rev. William Rich, Dr. L. E. Smith spoke on "Our Church and Higher Educaton."

Dr. A. J. Walton spoke on "The Rural Church's Opportunity" after which the conference recessed for a meeting of the Christian Missionary Association.

Rev. Richard Jackson made the following report on Foreign

Missions:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

When someone asked Phillips Brooks what he would do first if he were called to be a pastor of a broken-down church—a church without a building, unable to support a pastor and torn by internal dissension—he made this reply, "I should get all the people together, preach the greatest sermon I could on world wide missions, and take the best offering I could for heathen lands."

Phillips Brooks understood that the vitality of a church depends not upon the condition of its physical facilties nor on the eloquence of its minister nor on the wealth and influence of its members—but it does depend upon that church's conception of its task. Any church, be it large or small, which conceives its fundamental responsibility to be that of "ministering rather than being ministered unto" will be a vital, growing, fruitful church.

Many of our churches have the mistaken idea that their own needs are so important that they must pass up giving to others this year. They believe that they can grow most rapidly by concentrating on themselves. Such is not the case, for the less a church spends for the needs of others, the less it has for itself, and conversely, the more it gives to others, the

more it has for its own work.

Recent statistical tables show that the Southern Convention spends more upon its own work than any state conference in the Unied States except California. The percentage we give to foreign missions is the lowest of any state, and last year it showed a decline of \$2,000. Of the 42 state conferences, only 11 showed a decline in giving, one of which was our own.

These are facts we had better ponder a long time.

The need this year for continuing and expanding our foreign mission work is tremendous. With two out of three people of the world suffering from malnutrition, and an equal number illiterate, there is no time to retrench. People by the millions in many parts of the world suffer—fathers, mothers, little children, the lonely, and the abandoned. They are hungry, sick, persecuted, destitute, nearly naked, cold, bitter, bewildered, abused, neglected and afraid.

Your committee makes the following recommendations to the churches:

1. That each church not only pay its mission apportionment in full, but that a special Over-and-Above offering be taken at Easter time for

our World Christian Mission.

That each church have at least one missionary speaker and devote one period during the year for missionary education of its membership.

RICHARD L. JACKSON, Chairman MRS. C. A. BALLENTINE MISS MARGARET ALSTON

Mrs. R. L. Jackson spoke on "Our Missionary Responsibility." Rev. Carl Key made an appeal for support of the Chrstian Rural Overseas Program.

Rev. Morton Kurtz spoke on behalf of the North Carolina Con-

ference of Churches.

S. H. Basnight presented the following report on Apportionments:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON APPORTIONMENTS

There have been three complaints on the Apportionments but we don't feel any of them are too serious and have written to all three of those complaining asking that they please try to raise the apportionment allotted this time and that apportionments will be changed at the next General Convention in 1954.

Therefore, we suggest that the present apportionments allotted to the various churches remain as they are until the 1954 Convention. These apportionments are listed on page 204 of Volume Eighty-One of the Annual.

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Any who feel that their apportionment is too large should simply pay what they feel like they should pay, and I am sure there will be no questions asked because, after all, this business of collecting money for the church is not a compulsory sort of thing and can't be collected that way. It is a free-will offering and the allotments are necessarily suggestions and this does not necessarily mean that they are absolutely fair in every instance. Some may not have been alloted enough and others may feel like they are asked for too much. Our suggestion is to do the best you can and even angels can't do better.

We hope that all the churches will support 100 per cent our entire program and that all the churches will make it a habit to pay monthly and quarterly where possible as it will materially help in every instance in get-

ting the full amount. Please bear this in mind.

The Executive Committee of the Eastern North Carolina Conference of Congregational Christian Churches, meeting during the session of the Conference at the Shallow Well Church on Oct. 20, 1953 voted to submit the following to conference:

Voted: that the program committee be instructed to plan for a oneday session of conference in the fall of 1954, and that the Executive Committee, if it deems advisable, plan for a spring meeting of an educational

and inspirational nature.

A recommendation was made that next year the reports of the various committees be sent to each church in advance of the Conference meeting. Adopted by common consent.

L. L. Vaughn made the following report of the nominating committee:

President, Dr. W. B. O'Neill; Vice President, Rev. Carl Wallace; Secretary, Rev. Richard L. Jackson; Treasurer, W. J. Ballentine; Laymen at large on the Executive Committee, T. N. Daughtery and A. G. Johnson; Representative on N. C. Council of churches, Rev. W. A. Grissom and Rev. F. P. Register; Representative to the Executive Board of the Southern Convention Class of 1954-1958, Miss Susie Allen.

A motion was passed to instruct the secretary to cast a unanimous ballot for the above officers. This was done.

A motion was adopted by the conference as follows:

Be it resolved that the Eastern North Carolina Conference consider the more effective use of its laymen as officers of the conference.

The chairman of the Committee on the Ministry made the following report:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION AND STANDING OF THE MINISTRY

We, the members of this Committee, make the following recommendations:

1. That the name of Robert A. McLean be dropped from the list of Licentiates of this Conference, he having removed his Church membership to a Church of another denomination.

2. That John P. Littiken be continued as a Candidate for the Ministry in the Biblical Class and that he be licensed on the satisfactory com-

pletion of his sophomore year at Elon College.

3. That Gil Marsh, a member of United Church, Chapel Hill and a student at Yale Divinity School, be received as a candidate for the

Ministry in the Biblical Class.
4. That Hamilton Witter, a member of United Church, Chapel Hill, a graduate of Allegheny College, who has completed one and one-half years at Pacific School of Religion, and who is now a student at Duke Divinity School, be received as a Candidate for the Ministry in the Biblical Class.

5. That Carl J. Dixon who has satisfactorily completed one year of a prescribed course of study be continued as a Candidate for the Ministry in the Biblical Class with the understanding that on the satisfactory completion of a second year's work, and the Committee, approves, he shall be granted licensure and admitted to a further course of study covering a period of three years on the satisfactory completion of which he shall be eligible to Conference Ordination. And, that he be given the privilege from the present date of serving a church under the direction of a minister in full standing of this Conference who shall be acceptable to the local church in question.

6. That the Rev. William A. Rich, who holds Conference Ordination, and who has completed his work at Duke Divinity School, be ad-

mitted as a minister in full standing of this Confeernce.

7. That the Rev. G. Julius Rice who holds Conference Ordination in the North Carolina and Virginia Conference and who has accepted the Shallow Well and Turner's Chapel pastorate be received into this Conference and be granted equal standing pending the receipt of his credentials from the North Carolina and Virginia Conference.

8. That the Rev. Frederick B. Eutsler be granted a Letter of Transfer of his ministerial standing to the New Haven (Conn.) Association

of Congregational Christian Churches.

9. That the Rev. William L. Parker who seeks permission to engage in secular work fo ra season and at the same time retain his ministerial status in this Conference be granted this request with the understanding that he maintain his Church membership in a Congregational Christian Church and make the required annual report to Conference.

10. That James Hatch and Billy Joe Willett, high school students and members of the Southern Pines and Sanford Churches respectively, be received under the care of Conference as prospective candidates

for the ministry.

11. That the Rev. Charles M. Jones, a member of United Church, Chapel Hill, and ordained by the Presbytery of West Hanover, Synod of Virginia on April 20, 1932 who has declared himself in full accord with the Principles, Polity, and Government of the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches; willingly subscribes to the ordination vows required of candidates by our Conference; and who has given your Committee every assurance of his willingness to cooperate in matters of denominational concern, be received as a

minister of this Conference in full standing.

12. In accordance with a motion passed by the North Carolina and Virginia Conference we recommend: That the Committee on the Ministry of the Southern Convention be requested to set up in cooperation with the Department of Religion of Elon College Seminars dealing with the practical relations of the pastoral office and of Church administration, for members of the Biblical Class, Licentiates, and Ministers holding Local Ordination who are serving churches as pastors; that pastors of considerable experience be invited to share in conducting these Seminars; and that Pastors in the Biblical Class, Licentiates, and those having Conference Ordination be required to attend these Seminars.

The report was adopted by almost a unanimous vote.

The resolutions in the report on Evangelism presented at the morning session were unanimously adopted.

At the suggestion of Dr. W. T. Scott, and on motion by Rev.

E. M. Powell, a motion was made and adopted as follows:

That we engage in a Crusade of Christian Evangelism and Stewardship during the 1953-54 Conference by each church adopting the following goal:

1. A survey of the parsh or community to determine the per-

sons who are not professing Christians.

2. An active program of enlistment for Christ and his church all unchurched in the community.

- 3. A presentation of the principles of Christian stewardship as enunciated by the Holy Scriptures, especially the teachings of Jesus.
- 4. The enlistment of tithers.

The resolutions in the report on Stewardship presented at the morning session were unanimously adopted.

The resolutions in the report on Christian Education presented

at the morning session were unanimously adopted.

The following motion, presented by Rev. Carl Wallace, was

passed unanimously by the conference:

I move that this conference consider for all practical purposes the president of the Sunday School Convention as a member of the Committee on Christian Education and that the conference program on Christian education be considered the privilege and responsibility of that committee rather than the president of the Sunday School Convention.

The resolutions in the report on Religious literature were adopted with the following amendment:

Resolution No. 1—

That each church strive towards the use of our own denominational literature in every department of training in the local program, add: (whenever after careful examination the literature proves to fulfill the need of the local organization).

The resolutions in the report on Social Action and Foreign

Missions presented earlier were adopted as read.

The resolutions included in the report on Home Missions presented at the morning session were adopted by unanimous vote.

A motion made by Rev. Carl Wallace was adopted as follows: "That the Conference consider for all practical purposes the president of the Conference Missionary Association as a member of the Committee on Home Missions."

Dr. W. B. O'Neill presented Billy Joe Will, now studying in the Sanford High School, who hopes to enter the Christian min-

istrv.

A vote of thanks was exenteded to the secretary, Rev. R. L. Jackson and to Mrs. Lindsay Neville for secretarial services in preparing the mimeographed reports of the various committees.

The Committee on Resolutions chairman, Miss Susie Allen,

made the following report:

We, your Committee on Resolutions, submit the following report:

Be it resolved:

1. That we express our deep gratitude to the Program Planning Committee for their foresight in presenting such forceful and inspiring speakers as: Dr. W. E. Wisseman, Mr. Martin Garren, Dr. A. J. Walton, Dr. and Mrs. W. T. Scott, Dr. L. E. Smith, the Rev. Carl Key, Mr. Morton Kurtz, and those of our own Conference who have appeared on the program.

Further, that we express appreciation to Dr. J. G. Truitt and Dr. F. C. Lester in anticipation of their contribution to the program of

the evening hour.

2. That we express appreciation to the officers and leaders of the Eastern North Carolina Conference for their untiring efforts in our behalf during the past year.

3. That we record with sorrow our loss in the death of Dr. Robert Lee

4. That we heartily endorse the program of the Church Building and Loan Campaign of the General Council and urge all churches within the Conference to sign the Declaration of Purpose before January first, 1954.

And we further urge all delegates and ministers in attendance to take seriously the recommendations presented by report today and to make a definite effort to embody these suggestions in the pro-

gram of each local church.

5. That we express grateful thanks to the Shallow Well Church for the cordial welcome accorded us, for the gracious hospitality we have enjoyed, and a special word of thanks to the women of the church for food well-prepared and well-served.

The Committee on Place, (Rev. William Grissom, chairman), reported that the Conference will meet at the PineyPlains Church next year.

Mr. W. H. McIver made the following report:

Your Finance Committee has checked the report of the Conference treasurer. His report and records were found to be correct and in order. We heartily commend Mr. W. J. Ballentine for his faithfulness this year and for many years previous in performing his duties in this office.

We recommend that the following items be paid:

1. \$50 as our contribution to the North Carolina Council of Churches.

2. \$12 to reimburse Rev. Fred Register for telephone expense in connection with conference matters.

3. \$15 to Fuquay Printery for printing conference programs for this session of conference.

4.\$50 compensation for the services of Richard Jackson as conference secretary. We also recommend that the secretary be reimbursed for all postage, telephone and other necessary expenses in connection with the duties of secretary.

5. We recommend that 150 annuals be requested and paid for by the conference, to be distributed as before, one copy to each pastor, one to each chairman of a committee and to the churches provided the annuals can be published and distributed not later than March, 1954.

We have had numerous requests that the Conference provide printed or mimeographed copies of the Beginnings, Beliefs and Practices of our Congregational Christian Church as given in the messages of Dr. Scott and Wisseman, and that they be distributed to all the members of our churches. We therefore, recommend that the superintendent of the Southern Convenion request all the other conferences to join us in this matter in order to reduce the expense of printing, and that each conference pay its proportional part o fthe cost.

The report was adopted as read.

A motion was made and passed that after the churches have indicated ther choices as Southern Convention delegates, that they be officially approved by the conference.

The afternoon session was officially closed.

EVENING SESSION

The evening session of the Conference was called to order by the president at 7 P. M. Dr. John Truitt gave a report on the Christian Orphanage.

Rev. Richard L. Jackson read the report of the Memoirs Committee as follows:

IN MEMORIAM—ROBERT LEE HOUSE

Today we remember and honor a beloved fellow pastor, a leader of great stature among our Southern Convention Churches. Robert Lee House first began his ministry by serving churches in the Eastern North Carolina Conference while he was a student at Duke University in 1925. On January 20 of this year, while serving as pastor of the Church of the Wide Fellowship in Southern Pines, his earthly ministry came to an end.

Utter simplicity, gallant purpose, high courage, complete consecration to the task marked this man of God who served among us. His sudden

going brings us a consciousness of an overwhelming loss.

Yet, if Lee House were to speak to us today, I am confident that he would not want us to mourn his passing, but to give ourselves more fully in high resolve and in loyal service to the cause for which his own life was given. The Christian Sun, Franklinton College, the Church of Jesus Christ -these were dear to his heart. Who among us will rise up and carry on where he left off? That call should ring throughout the church and evoke a great response. Thus his death may accomplish that for which he spent his life—a loving and loyal consecration of the church to the task of advancing the Kingdom of God.

Matthew Arnold has written a few lines which seem to me to be especially appropriate on this occasion. I don't know about whom they were originally written, but they can well be said of Lee House.

"If, in the paths of the world Stones might have wounded thy feet, Toil or dejection have tried Thy spirit, of that we saw Nothing-to us thou wast still Cheerful, and helpful, and firm! Therefore, to thee it was given Many to save with thyself; And, at the end of thy day. O, faithful shepherd, to come Bringing thy sheep in thy hand."

—The Man We Knew

We recommend that the conference stand for a few moments in silence to the memory of this great Christian spirit. After this tribute our president will give a closing prayer.

A motion was passed that after the communion service is over, the 128th Annual Conference of the Eastern North Carolna Conference of Congregational Christian Churches be declared officially ended to meet again on the Tuesday following the third Sunday of October, 1954 in Piney Plans Church.

After the Conference Sermon by Dr. F. C. Lester on the subject "Reasons for a Growing Church," a communion service was conducted by the Rev. Will B. O'Neill and the Rev. Carl Wallace.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Christian education is a vital part of the life and the work of our churches and we must constantly keep this in mind if our churches are to advance in the work of God.

Your committee recommends a line of work for your church to follow this year as we strive to do a greater work than ever before.

1. Improve our Sunday schools by discovering the principal causes for people leaving the schools. There are several leaks that usually develop in any church school: (1) the teacher problem; (2) lack of Christian spirit; (3) poor organization; (4) crowded conditions; (5) poor literature and equipment.

Vacation Bible Schools are the most interesting and at the same time the most challenging opportunity for enlarging the work of Christian education. More and more of our churches are conducting Bible schools each year. Is your church following this line of work?

3. Sunday evenings and mid-week nights are being used in some churches for special study courses. In this way the church can actually

double the amount of its Christian teaching.

4. Audio and visual aids are playing a great part in our Christian education program. Films, film strips, and slides are available from our

Southern Convention office.

- 5. The Pilgrim Fellowship is offering splendid opportunities for the training of our young people. The rallies of our Conference have brought forth many outstanding young people who are doing a splendid job as church leaders. The young people are still in need of encouragement and advice.
- To support our college this year in a more vigorous way by sending our own children to Elon will be a great help to that institution. More and more of our young people are choosing other colleges than our own and by doing this we are losing them to other denominations. On Elon's campus our laymen, ministers, missionaries and Christian workers are trained.

CHURCH BUILDING LOAN FUND

This is a progress report from your committee, which has been working to raise our share of \$11,500 of the \$4,500,000 Building Loan Fund of our denomination. This money is to be loaned to churches to make improvements, build in new communities, aid in places where misfortune has come, or in any way to make it possible for children and their parents to worship Christ. By September in the denomination as a whole, \$3,500,000 had been pledged. That is fine.

How about our Conference? Eight churches have entered into the program and made their declarations to the amount of \$3,410, which is only about one-fourth of our total goal. These are the churches that have seen the need for such aid: Asheboro, Flint Hill (R), Hanks Chapel, High Point, Liberty, Pleasant Ridge, Pleasant Union, and Spoon's Chapel.

This might indicate that your committee has not been at work. But we have had four meetings of the committee, one conference-wide meeting of the churches, and two area meetings of the churches. At least, such meetings have been called, but the response has not been too good.

However, we believe that other churches will want to make their declarations of purpose soon—the money does not have to be paid until 1955. The Western N. C. Conference is at the bottom of the list in the conferences of the Southern Convention, so far as churches sending in these declarations is concerned. This does not give a true picture of our belief. We want others to have churches, and we do not want the world at large to think that we are happy if only our little family of churches here has a place to worship. We want the Church of Christ to be greater in every respect. If it is going to be, we must help it by giving to this fund that will always be there to help when the need comes.

One never knows when storms, floods, fire or some other disaster may strike our own church and we would need to seek aid. We would not want to hear the answer that so many have had to hear recently—no funds with which to aid your worthy cause.

This is our opportunity to lend a helping hand. Let us not fail to do so.

ELON COLLEGE SUSTAINING FUND

The need for colleges does not need argument in our day. Fifty years ago that battle was settled in the affirmative in North Carolina, and in our churches of this area. We want our children to get at least a college edu-

caion, and that regardless of how they make their living later.

There is still some debate about the state furnishing all college education, as it does the grammar grades and high school at present. Among us are many who believe that the Church has responsibility in this realm of higher education. We think that young people who are planning life and its work should be surrounded by Christian influences, and that a Christian college is more than a name. It is a powerful force in fashioning the destiny of mankind.

Since the Church, or Christian, college is of such worth, it follows, as

night the day, that these colleges are worthy of our support.

A generation now gone gave us Elon College. Many of them never attended any college, but they believed that we would be worthy of their sacrificial gift to us. It stands within about fifty miles of our homes. Several million dollars have been invested in it. But it will not operate alone. People must make it useful. We can help.

Every member of our churches is asked to give ONE DOLLAR each year to help make Elon College useful in our generation. Is that too much? Is that a burden? Surely not. But it will help Elon College to do what it

was established to do.

Your committee recommends that the Conference again request the churches to give to Elon College one dollar per member annually for what is known as the Sustaining Fund.

EVANGELISM

Evangelism has been the heart-beat of the Church throughout its life. Your life is one of "living evangelism" if you are Christian in your daily conduct.

Your Committee reviews the reports from the several churches of this Conference with alarm. Many of our churches show loss in membership for the past six years. Our total gain for the years 1947 through 1952 is 285 members. This is a gain of less than 48 members per conference year for the six year period. Statistics do not tell the whole story. With a nation of approximately one-half the people unchurched, and most of them with no hope of eternal life, there is room for alarm in this nation called "Christian America." Christ was not jesting when He said, "Make disciples of all men." Peter at Pentecost preached the word with power. The result was three thousand souls born into the Christian way of life. We, too, need the fire that fell on those of that day.

We, your committee, make these recommendations for your consideration:

1. That we begin immediately to make plans to conduct a Conferencewide revival in the spring; that this effort be made with the hope that the entire Conference work together; that the results be kept of the revival, and the Committee on Evangelism be given the record for next year's discussion.

2. That we set as a minimum goal 10 per cent increase in member-

ship for the next conference year.

3. That we work out with our individual churches a plan for an everymember community canvass, and that this be done prior to the revival in the spring. Let this be a "Community Visitation Evangelism" effort.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Your committee has tried to perform the duties committed to it. Several meetings have been held. Among the most important things done are the following:

A meeting with the officials of our Randleman church revealed that there had been some misunderstandings, and that the church was in need of help that it had not received. A grant of \$200 was made to the church

to pay on its debt for its nice, new church building.

Many years ago the Congregational Building Society made a grant loan of \$300 on a parsonage for what is now our Sophia church. A few years ago that building was sold, and a new parsonage built jointly by our Flint Hill (R) and Sophia churches. Title to the new parsonage is vested in this Conference. Rather than renew the mortgage, we paid the \$300 grant loan, and the title to the new parsonage is clear. It is hoped that the churches (Flint Hill and Sophia) will return part of the amount paid for them.

The Christmas issue of the Conference Reporter was published and distributed, as recommended by this Conference. Another issue was published for use at this session. A special issue of The Christian Sun in June carried information about the churches in this Conference, and copies were furnished to the churches. It is planned to make a report of this session to the

churches through a special issue of The Christian Sun.

In these and many other ways your committee has tried to strengthen the work of our churches in the Western North Carolina Conference of Congregational Christian Churches.

We realize that this is not a complete picture of the situation, as it does not include what the women's missionary societies have done or the gifts through the united church program.

We have on the field missionaries who are giving their all to this great work. They are carrying the Gospel of love to foreign lands. We should at least take a part of the many blessings that come to us and share in this

It is our hope that every church will have a mission study course and learn more about the great need of foreign missions. Let's make next year the greatest year of the Church, remembering that the more we give the more we will have for ourselves.

Matthew 25:40 says, "Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

make for us a great meeting.

In summing up this report I would like to say, "The laymen have been working hard in the local church to make it a better church and without their faith and work a great amount of God's plans would not have been accomplished."

That the churches pay in full the amount requested for the National

Boards so there will be money to meet these needs.

3. That a special offering be received at Christmas for these Veterans of the Cross so they get a little "extra" at that time, and that when trouble

comes to any of them there may be money to give the needed lift.

4. That all our ministers be members of the Annuity Fund for Congregational Ministers, and that the churches share in the payment of their

minister's dues.

STEWARDSHIP AND APPORTIONMENTS

Stewardship is a very important part of our Christian living. We urge that our members practice it with zeal in the use of time, talents, and resources. We further suggest that each church secure and use literature

for the teaching of stewardship.

In checking over what our Western North Carolina Conference church people gave last year, we find that we gave nearly \$4.00 for benevolences, or for others, and about \$21.00 for local church expenses, that is for ourselves, making a grand total of approximately \$25.00 per member. This is a tithe of an average income of \$250.00 per year per member. We suggest that our churches take an inventory of their resources and income to see if we are satisfied with the stewardship we are rendering unto our Lord. We urge that our ministers and members promote and encourage tithing in our churches.

We recommend:

1. That our Apportionments be the same as last year.

2. That each church pay 20 cents per member for ministerial insurance. This should be paid to the Conference treasurer before the end of the calendar year.

3. That all of our churches seek to raise \$1.00 per member for the Sustaining Fund for Elon College, and cooperate in helping to complete

the campaign for \$2,500,000 for Elon College.

4. We commend the churches that have signed the declaration of purpose to cooperate in the Church Building Fund Campaign. We urge that all of our churches join our Congregational Christian Churches of America

in supporting and successfully completing this campaign.

5. We have been informed that Bailey's Grove plans a new building this year. We commend this small congregation for this forward step. A new building is needed in this rapidly growing community. We recommend that the churches of the Conference make a special offering sometime during the year to help with this new building. (Money should be sent to the Conference treasurer, designated for Bailey's Grove building program.)

WOMEN'S WORK

The women's work of this Conference has been improving all the time. We are proud of the women for their splendid work and eagerness to learn of new ways to become better home missionaries.

Last year one of our main concerns was that only 15 of our 38 churches had organized women's societies. Well, we are still greatly concerned but we have made a step to improve this. We have a new society—Antioch

Church in Randolph County.

Our Spring Rally was held at Union Grove Church on Tuesday, March 22. We had approximately 50 women and six ministers attending this meeting. We should strive to double this number for our next rally, which will be held at Ramseur Church next spring. We are falling short on one of our main events and that is sending representatives to our conferences and conventions and the main one—the School of Missions. This past year we had only 9 to attend the School of missions, but we had 27 to attend the fall conference.

For our coming year we will study a portion of the Book of Psalms for

our Bible study.

Many of our societies are planning on buying a goat—not for personal use but we are sending them to Puerto Rico where they are desperately

needed to supply milk for poverty-stricken families.

Our women's work has had a big link missing in our chain of faithful women this year, that being Mrs. E. P. Boroughs. We were greatly grieved at her death. Last year at conference she was seriously ill and could not attend. This was the first time she had missed in 22 years. We all feel that even though she cannot be here in body she will always be with us in spirit. She will always remain in our memories and shine as a guiding light to us who are here and are trying to carry on the work she loved so well.

REPORT OF HISTORIAN Deep River Conference

The Deep River Christian Conference was organized in 1864. It met under this name until 1894 when the name was changed to "The Western North Carolina Christian Conference." In that year the Deep River Conference and the North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference united and then divided into three conferences: Western North Carolina, Eastern

North Carolina, and North Carolina and Virginia.

Authorization for the above changes is found in *The Christians' Annual* for 1894 on page 54, and in the same year book for 1895 on page 15 under "proceedings of the General Convention of the Christian Church." On page 75 of the 1895 year book is this record, "On motion, the name of this, the Deep River Christian Conference, was changed to the Western North Carolina Christian Conference, to take effect at the adjournment of the present session."

The Christians' Annual for 1896, beginning on page 59, carries "Proceedings of the First Annual Session of the Western North Carolina Christian Conference." This session was held at Smithwood Church, Novem-

ber 6, 1895.

(All these records are to be found in the library of Elon College.)

The name of the Conference continued until when the name was changed to "The Western North Carolina Conference of Congregational Christian Churches."

Pleasant Hill Christian Church

Pleasant Hill Church was organized in 1823, when the Rev. John Allen, a minister of the Christian denomination, began preaching in a school building near the present location of the church. The next year a building was started which was completed in 1825. It was named Pleasant Hill by Rev. Nicholas Barron, and regular services have been held since then.

Besides the first two ministers, these served until 1841: Lewis Craven, Subal Evans, Martin Staley, and Alfred Isley.

The remainder of the conference year the church was served by two young men from its membership-Norman Carter and M. L. Fogleman.

On September 3, 1947, the Reverend M. A. Pollard and his wife moved into the new parsonage near the church. The parsonage was dedicated on June 6, 1948 by the pastor. Beginning with the conference year in 1950 the Pleasant Hill church, for the first time in its history, had a minister for full-time service.

In 1823 Pleasant Hill began with six charter members—Martin Staley. Subal Evans, Susanna Tyson, Elizabeth Coble, Mary Murchison and Celia Way. This year, 130 years later, the church reports a membership of 285.

A temperance society was organized ten years after the church, in 1833. It still holds its regular meetings on or near the fourth of July each year. For several years it has held a mid-year session at Cane Creek Friends Church in December.

A Sunday school was organized at Pleasant Hill in April, 1871. It has

grown through the years, and today it reports a membership of 368.

O. H. White, pastor of the host church, welcomed the conference to Tryon and to the Congregational Church of Christ.

The report of the Executive Committee was presented as follows:

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

We, your Executive Committe, approved the following on March 15, 1953:

That we lease the former New Hope Christian Church property, located near Stokesdale, N. C., for the sum of one dollar and other considerations, to C. H. Middleton, Route 2, Stokesdale, N. C., until January 1, 1954.

until January 1, 1954. On October 12, 1953, we voted that Superintendent W. T. Scott investigate further the property above mentioned and make some disposal of the property.

We gave approval to the following resolution on August 8, 1953:

RESOLUTION

"Be it resolved by the Executive Committee of the North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference in session this the 8th day of August, 1953, that the Hopedale Christian Church be and is herby authorized to borrow from the First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Burlington, North Carolina, the sum of Thirteen Thousand Dollars (\$13,000); and that the officers of this conference be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to execute a deed of trust on the church property, to wit: the same property that is described in that certain deed from Joseph E. Gant, Jr., and others to North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference, by a deed dated February 11, 1953, which is being filed for record in the office of the Register of Deeds for Alamance County, to which reference is hereby made for a more detailed description, in the sum of \$13,000, and also to execute a note to accompany said deed of trust, all of said papers are to be in form as required by the said Association; and said Association is authorized and empowered to pay the net proceeds from said loan to the proper officer or officers of said Hopedale Christian Church, and said Association will not be charged with the responsibility for application of the proceeds from said loan; and empowered to do any and everything necessary in the premises or required by said Association, to effectuate said loan."

I. W. J. Andes, Secretary of the North Carolina and Virginia Conference, do hereby certify that the foregoing is an exact and true copy of a

resolution duly adopted by the Executive Committee of the North Carolina and Virginia Christian Conference at a meeting held on the 8th day of August, 1953, at Elon College, North Carolina, which meeting was attended by a quorum of the members of said committee regularly called and held.

"To the North Carolina and Virginia Conference of Congregational Christian Churches:

We the members, as we trust, of the body of Christ, having exercised repentance toward God and faith toward our Lord Jesus Christ, agree to be governed by the following principles:

1. The Lord Jesus Christ is the only Head of the Church.

2. Christian is a sufficient name for the Church.

3. The Holy Bible is a sufficient rule of faith and practice.

4. Christian character is a sufficient test of fellowship and of church membership.

5. The right of private judgment and the liberty of conscience is a right and privilege that should be accorded to and exercised by all.

6. The union of all Christ's followers.

We, having since 1950 been associated as The Community Church, Inc., of Hendersonville, N. C., and said church having expressed by vote on August 3, 1953, the desire to affiliate with the Congregational Christian Churches of the United States of America, and by vote of August 3, 1953, authorized the officers of our church whose signatures appear below to make formal application for such affiliation with the Congregational Chris-

tian denomination through the North Carolina and Virginia Conference.
Dr. C. M. Heymann, Pastor; F. H. Roberts, Vice-President; Asa B. Hadden, Treasurer; Hilary G. Neighbors, Clerk; A. A. McCall, President—Directors. Date: August 7, 1953."

By motion, The Community Church, Inc., Hendersonville, N. C., was enrolled as a member of the Conference and the church is to be known as "The First Congregational Church" of Hendersonville, N. C. Dr. W. T. Scott and Dr. H. E. Robinson were asked to arrange a Service of Recognition and Reception into the Conference. The Church was received formally into the Conference on September 3, 1953. On August 13, 1953, we approved, upon the recommendation of the Committee on Ministry, the transfer of Dr. C. M. Heymann, Hendersonville, N. C., from the Carolina Baptist Association to the office of an ordained elder in the North Carolina and Virginia Conference.

On August 13, 1953, Rev. H. P. Bozarth was appointed by the President

of the Conference to serve on the Committee on Ministry.

Pursuant to vote of last conference, your Executive Committee arranged the sessions of this Conference to be held at the Tryon Congregational Church of Christ, beginning at 2 P. M. on November 10, and closing at noon on November 11.

Your Executive Committee recommends that the President of Conference and Superintendent W. T. Scott be asked to seek legal advice regarding the bequest of Miss M. Joanna Jones of Graham, N. C., and report to

the Executive Committee.

Regarding the "Dependent Coverage" in the Ministers' Group Insurance, your Executive Committee recommends that the semi-annual payments for Dependent Coverage be paid by January 1, and July 1, or the policy will be cancelled. It is to be noted that under our contract with the Insurance Company cancelled contracts for Dependent Coverage cannot be recovered. Pursuant to the request of the Executive Committee, the secretary of Conference wrote ministers whose "Dependent Coverage" payments

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were in arrears and urged their payments immediately.

Your Executive Committee feels that it is imperative to revise the charter of the present Conference. Therefore, we urge Superintendent W. T. Scott to call into session the Executive Committees of the three North Carolina Conferences and seek to clarify charters, boundaries and other matters related to all of the Conferences in North Carolina.

Rev. John R. Lackey, pastor of Apple's Chapel, an ordained minister of this Conference with Local Conference Standing, graduated last June from the Duke Divinity School of Duke University. It is recommended that this Conference accord Mr. Lackey Full Standing as a Congregational Chris-

The report of the Committee on Missions was presented as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS

We have reason to rejoice over the progress being made by the young churches of our Conference. The Beverly Hills, Lakeview and Zion Churches, all located in the Burlington area, have shown outstanding progress this year. A few weeks ago some of our Conference officials met again with interested parties in the South Boston area. Prospects for a new church here are still good. No further progress has been made toward a new church in Danville, Va., though something yet may be done in this area. The Conference should do everything it can toward encouraging all these new projects. They need our help. Let's not let them down!

We make the following recommendations:

 That every church in the Conference try to get their Declaration of Purpose for the Church Building Loan Fund to Algie Blalock, the Conference Chairman of this Fund, as soon as possible. Let's support this Fund one hundred per cent!

2. That every church, where possible, begin making payments on their Declaration of Purpose at the earliest date possible. These payments

should be completed not later than March 1, 1956.

3. That the pastors and officials of our churches inform their people about this Fund, and that all possible encouragement be given toward making this Drive a success!

We say we are deeply concerned about present day world conditions. We agree that one of the greatest needs of our day is to have Christ rule the hearts and minds of men. When Christ said, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel," He meant that we of the Christian Faith are the ones to do it-at home or abroad.

What are we doing about it? What a person gives is a good measuring stick as to his quality of life. In the October issue of The Christian Herald the following statements were made: "In 1952 Americans contributed \$1,296,000,000 to churches and religious organizations. That is almost \$5,000,000 a week. That sounds like a lot of money until you begin comparing it with other expenditures. Then it is evident that no one yet is giving the buttons off his shirt.

"During this same period we spent \$2,234,000,000 on television sets. We spent \$50,000,000 more on lipstick and other do-dads to pretty up the person than we gave to the church. New refrigerators and household appliances took twice as much as did religion; tobacco took four times as much; new automobiles seven times as much. We gave just about as much to the church as we spent on funeral services, cemetery lots and tombstones combined. (That may be a sign of our times—is our religion also dead?) Our church giving was just a little more than we spent on rugs and linoleums. And this tops them all—we spent eight times as much for alcoholic beverages as we did for the Kingdom of God!" Yet we dare call ourselves Chris-

Are we really concerned about our "World Mission?" Do we actually believe the world needs Christ today? Can we say we are doing what we can toward fulfilling the Great Commission? May God help us to wake up and prove ourselves worthy of our calling.

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA WOMAN'S CONFERENCE

The health of the North Carolina Woman's Missionary Conference for

the past year may well be declared alive and alert.

In this Conference area, the society at Kallam Grove was reorganized, and two meetings were held with the women of the Bethlehem church for the purpose of talking through plans for organization of a new society there.

We shall hope to report this new society soon.

May we share just a few of the highlights from reports? Seven societies wish to raise their own apportionment goals for next year! Offerings amounting to a grand total of \$10,528.25 were contributed by the approximate 2,312 members of the Conference. This record means that we not only reached our goal but that we gave more than five hundred dollars "over the goal," or a gain of more than eleven hundred over the grand total of last year. Two other figures might be of great interest: Thank Offering—\$2,279.24, and Life Memberships and Memorials—\$770.00. We rejoice not only in the achievement of our financial goals, but in the faith that much ultimate good may be accomplished with the aid of these material instruments.

Our Mission Sudy theme was "Building with Love and Gratitude." There was a visible gain in Life Memberships and Memorials. Seven more certificates were issued this year than last year and three more churches contributed. Fifteen societies report having active local Councils of Church Women, six more than were reported last year. Only four churches reported no Friendly Service projects and those four reported community services performed. Under Visual Aids there was the request for more information on our own missionaries and our own Mission work. This is a healthful sign for growth. The goal for Family Life has been "Every Family a Church Family." The Department of Social Action was reorganized. About 600 children are enrolled in our Cradle Roll. Their offerings amounted to \$463.96.

Without a spiritual thermometer, it is hard to report the temperature of the Spiritual Life of our Conference, but we can report that much effort was made in this department to encourage well-planned devotional programs. Seventeen publications were assembled and mailed to each society. Also purchased and made available to any society who requested them were 32 publications, including books, pamphlets and leaflets.

"The Task of the Church Around the World" is the challenge ahead of us! The gospel of Christ must be taken to every creature, beginning with ourselves. Will we accept our share of this responsibility, this Task of the Church? May God help us as we plan and set the new and higher goals for

the next year.

During the year, Leadership Training Schools have been held in Greensboro, Union (Va.), and Burlington. The Chairman assisted in a Leadership School at Wake Chapel in the Eastern N. C. Conference and supervised practice teaching for a week at our Negro Conference at Brick Rural Life School at Bricks, N. C.

Pilgrim Series previews were held at Greensboro First and Union (N. C.) Churches. This program proved most helpful and plans are to

extend this service.

Two Junior Camps and one Junior High Camp were held at Camp Crabtree near Cary, N. C. The Senior Youth Conference was held at Elon College. A total of twenty-two churches in our conference sent delegates

to these Camps and Conferences.

Vacation Bible Schools were held in many of our churches. Materials for use in these schools were made available through the Convention office. Student Summer service workers were sent to some of our churches to plan and supervise Vacation Schools. The First Church, Greensboro, held a day camp Vacation Bible School for their Junior group.

The Pilgrim Fellowship, under the leadership of its officers—Curtis Young, President; Lois Scott, Vice-President; Wilma Ann Saunders, Secretary; and Patricia Gordon, Treasurer—have had a successful year. This question should be decided before we ask for continuation of this Conference Committee. This committee has no report of meetings or work sponsored. At present ours is only a "paper" committee.

REPORT OF THE EASTERN VIRGINIA WOMAN'S MISSIONARY CONFERENCE

"A Highway For Our God" was the theme for the thirty-ninth annual session of the Eastern Virginia Woman's Missionary Conference which was held at Bethlehem, (Nansemond County) Church with Mrs. W. T. Harrell, President, presiding. Dr. W. W. Sloan, professor of Bible and Philosophy at Elon College, vividly told how the highway was being built through Africa. Rev. Emerson Smith, Director of the Interracial Department of the Virginia Council of Churches, expressed the desire for a more friendly route for the migrants of Virginia. A new constitution was adopted, also, the revised Achievement goals for the convention. The financial goal of ten thousand dollars was exceeded. Dr. W. T. Scott installed Mrs. Garland Spratley, President, Mrs. Ray Gordon, Vice-President, Mrs. H. S. Hardcastle, Recording Secretary, Mrs. L. W. Stagg, Corresponding Secretary, and Mrs. George Cornell, Treasurer.

The Fortieth annual session was held on October second, at the Christian Temple, with the President, Mrs. Garland Spratley, presiding. Dr. W. W. Sloan spoke on "Africa, As I Saw It." He and Mrs. Sloan having spent the summer there. He reported most of the natives in government positions are products of the Christian Mission Schools. Rev. James Madren and W. T. Scott told of our Carroll County Mission, which was the recipient

of the 1952 Thankoffering.

The superintendent of the Waverly, Suffolk, and Norfolk Districts reported attendance at the district meetings has increased. Miss Pattie Lee Coghill, Educational Secretary of the Southern Convention, and Mrs. W. B. Williams, President of the Woman's Convention, were the guest speakers at the 1952 meetings. "Is It Nothing To You?" was the pertinent theme for 1953. Miss Hildegard Thiem captured the hearts of those present with her magnetic personality and enthusiastic portrayal of her work in the Caroline Islands.

"When you care, you will share," has been demonstrated by the gifts to our Friendly Service projects and the generous Thank Offering for Elon College and our Carroll County Mission, Franklinton Center has shared in the Life Memberships and Memorial Fund. The fellowship of our women has extended to the women of all denominations the observance of the World Day of Prayer, Mayfellowship Day and World Community Day. The members of our board have shared their information with the editor of the Woman's Page in the Christian Sun. There are one fourth of our societies

active in local Councils of Church work.

Dr. Truman Douglas delighted a host of women at the Mission Institute in Suffolk, when he reviewed his book, "Missions To America." The Elon School of Missions is growing in popularity, there were forty-six attending from this conference last summer. We had representatives at the Service of Worship and Dedication, The National Fellowship of Congregational Christian Women at the Biennial meeting of the General Council in Claremont, California, on June twenty-second, when our president, Mrs. W. B. Williams, presented the gift to the women of this convention for dedication.

As we journey along the King's Highway may we rededicate our lives

to His service in a greater spirit of love and gratitude.

THE VALLEY OF VIRGINIA WOMEN'S MISSIONARY CONFERENCE

I was installed President of the Valley Conference Women to succeed Mrs. J. E. Bryant, October 9, 1952, in a very impressive service of installation led by the Convention President, Mrs. W. B. Williams, at the twenty-fifth annual session of the Virginia Valley Woman's Missionary Conference, at the Bethel Church.

Of the twenty churches in the Valley Conference, fourteen have active Women's organizations. Most of them have a definite Missionary program.

I have secured from the other six churches the name and address of a key woman, through whom I hope to work toward the goal of a complete

organization of our women.

One of the churches organized a caravan of workers to visit some of the churches without Missionary Societies to try to stimulate interest. This was a very fine experience we hope to continue. I have made a number of visits to churches without organization for Missions, and am hopeful of satisfactory results.

The people of the Valley responded generously to the Thank Offering, for the work in Carroll County. The purchase of Life Membership and Memorials continues steadily. We are mindful, too, of the Friendly Service Projects. Boxes of useful things have been sent to Lucy Perry Noble Institute in India as a result of the appeal of Miss Oline Nicholson last year. At Christmas time the response to Ellis Island was good. Clothing has been sent to Migratory camps, and bundles for Peace appeal on World Community day found us bringing more warm clothing. Currently, we are collecting articles needed at Franklinton Center.

The School of Missions at Elon College was attended by nine of our women last year. This year we are working toward having at least one

from each church.

I had the happy privilege of attending the Mid-winter Presidents meeting at Cleveland, Ohio, in January, and the Southeast regional meeting

at Avon Park, Florida. Both meetings were a real inspiration to me.

On March 29 the Spring rallies were held. The afternoon meeting for the southern part of the Conference was held in the Mt. Olivet (R) Church, and the evening service for the Northern district was held in the Winchester Church, with Mrs. David McKeith as guest speaker. Mrs. McKeith brought challenging messages at both meetings. The church building fund was presented by Mr. Phillips who gave us real inspiration to give the fullest support.

Realizing that we can only grow spiritually as we enrich our Prayer life, my home church last year formed a Prayer band. Though few in number we enjoy the experience of united Prayer for personal guidance, for the spiritual growth of our church, and for guidance in the work our "Master" would have us do around the world. It is my earnest Prayer that all our women might catch the spark; and that together we might

accomplish much in His name.

Duties of each department were outlined and plans were made for the year's work. The Board members were guests of the Raleigh Woman's Society at a delightful and delicious luncheon.

On October 26 the Burlington District (Mrs. C. C. Ward, Supt.) held a meeting of the presidents and program chairmen at the First Church in Burlington. The purpose and plan of this meeting was to give and get instructions concerning each department of our Conference work and to share the inspiration and experiences of the local societies in the Burlington District. A special effort was made to have every church represented and most of them were present. The Burlington Church women served refreshments.

November 23 the Greensboro District (Mrs. C. J. Wright, Supt.) held a similar "School of Instruction" for her presidents and program chairmen at the Reidsville church and the Reidsville women were hosts to the group,

serving refreshing fruit juice and cookies. Splendid attendance!

January 18 the Raleigh District (Mrs. D. M. Estes, Supt.) held its initial planning meeting at the Durham Church. Again, a large representative group was present. It was a fortunate day for the District Meeting. We were the guest of the Durham Church at a Tea and Bible Exhibition and to a service of Dedication of the Revised Standard Version of the Bible.

The Asheboro District (Mrs. Bill Simmons, Supt.) reports having met but since I did not attend this meeting I am unable to report the findings. Each of the other Districts have already made plans to get together

some time before the Fall Conference.

At the call of the Conference president, the District Superintendents had an "all-day and luncheon" meeting at the home of Mrs. D. M. Estes in Durham. Miss Pattie Lee Coghill was on hand every minute, running the whole gamut of "being helpful"—Business manager and chauffeur for the Rally Team, Official "Introductionist," Chairman of literature sales and service, etc. Really we couldn't get along without Pattie Lee!

The unusually large attendance and the very fine reports were indeed gratifying. The host churches did a "swell" job of entertaining. Each one made some extra contribution to the day's happiness. One church presented the guests with camelia corsages, another with artistic identification cards made in the form of a church, another served a free lunch, one church had six or more men present just to keep the fires going and the coffee hot. One district surprised us with a brand new society. For all of these extra specials we are grateful.

To the ministers, too, we would say a special word of appreciation. It meant a lot to have you present and to be assured of your interest and cooperation. Twenty or more ministers stood by us during the five days

of missionary emphasis.

Generous oferings, totaling \$160.76 were given, enabling all expenses of the Rallies to be paid including a special gift of \$25.00 to Mrs. David L. McKeith, Jr.—and still leaving a balance of \$52.02 to be added to our Thank Offering for Carroll County.

All arrows now point toward our Fall Conference which meets this year at our First Church, Greensboro. Our Conference planning committee is scheduled to meet on May 6 in Chapel Hill. An executive Board Meeting

will also be called before the Fall Conference convenes.

While we have every right to be proud of what has been accomplished in our North Carolina Conference we also stand ready to admit our guilt for the things left undone. There are those who are hungry, but we have not fed them, there are those who are naked, and we have not clothed them, those who are sick whom we have not visited, and many lonely and unhappy, but we have not comforted them. May we renew our faith, extend our services, and press ever onward toward the mark of the High Calling of God.

Mrs. L. W. Stagg read the Historian's report, which was received and made a part of the Convention's records, as follows:

REPORT OF HISTORIAN ('38 to '48)

Four decades have passed since organized work among our women began. These have been busy and happy years enriched by the fellowship always gained when Christian people work together for a common cause.

There could be no history were it not for looking backward as we shall now see. Today, we are meeting with the Burlington Congregational Christian Church for the third time—on May 3rd, 1916, and April 26th, 1932. Some of you may recall being here, unofficially, in May, 1913, just after the first session of the Woman's Missionary Convention adjourned at Elon in time for the women to come here for some special meeting of the Southern Christian Convention.

This report is concerned with the events from 1938 to 1948. The high-light of the 1938 session in Portsmouth, Virginia, was the report on the great Silver Jubilee which fittingly memoralized Dr. W. W. Staley, the founder of this organization. The details of this event have been recorded. but here must be added that his wise counsel did much to place our work upon a sound foundation. This period is one of interest in which new

The 14th session met at Elon College, N. C., April 18-19, 1939. The Convention was then looking forward to a School of Missions in June, 1940, under the leadership of Mrs. J. Monroe Harris. This was indeed a forward step, and proved to be a great success. This 14th session was marked by growing enthusiasm which was shown by reports from each department. The Conference Presidents reported fine work being done by all the societies. Dr. C. P. Garmon, our outstanding Missionary to Japan, was the guest speaker, and told of his thirty-three years' experience with the Japanese. This was the last time Dr. J. O. Atkinson, Mission Secretary, was to meet with us. Though too ill to speak, his great message on "Positive Faith" was read by his secretary, Mrs. Mattie Parker.

The goal for the next biennium was voted to remain \$20,000. Mrs. Stanley Harrell resigned, and Mrs. J. M. Harris became the eighth

President.

The 15th session met again at Elon College, N. C., on June 17-18, 1941. On Wednesday morning in the Whitley Auditorium lovely and sacred memorial services were held honoring the memory of our beloved Dr. J. O. Atkinson who passed away on July 2, 1940. Dr. Atkinson with his great faith, devotion to the mission cause, and boundless energy, directed our work from its inception. It was voted that the 1941 Conferences be dedicated to his memory with a memorial gift to be used to establish a scholarship under his name in the Theological Seminary at Bangalore, India. Dr. Ruth Seabury of the American Board, and Miss Angie Crew of Japan made a great contribution to this session. Total offering for the biennium was \$19,089.45.

The next, and sixteenth session, was held in the First Congregational Christian Church in Greensboro, N. C., June 15-16, 1943. Each department reporting showed marked advancement. The newly added Friendly Service Department should have special mention. Under the leadership of the late Mrs. Claud Eley some splendid work was done. Needed supplies were sent to the Japanese evacuees on the West Coast, Grants Hospital in New

Mexico, our mountain work, and other worthy and needy stations.

Mrs. Guy Theland of China was the guest speaker, and brought an inspirational message on "China's Greatest Need." The goal was exceeded by more than \$1,000.00, and the goal for the next biennium was \$22,250.00. Mrs. J. M. Harris resigned, making Mrs. W. E. Wisseman the ninth Presi-

dent.

The war, and travel restrictions made it necessary to cancel the session for 1945. The School of Missions was also suspended. Each Conference willingly responded to the "Stay-at-Home Convention" idea, and the work went on. When the 1947 session met at Elon College on June 17-18 the records for the past two bienniums were accepted as official. During this period three new departments were added. Interdenominational Cooperation, Friendly Service, and Historian. The offering was \$33,624.97. Mrs. W. E. Wisseman resigned, and Mrs. O. H. Davis became the tenth Presi-

dent. Again we were honored to have Dr. Ruth Seabury with us.

This eighteenth session will be reverently remembered for the sacred and lovely memorial service observed for Mrs. C. H. Rowland who passed on to greater work during the past biennium (this service has been recorded in the permanent records of this organization). Mrs. Rowland was the first President of this Convention serving six years. She served the Eastern Virginia Conference Woman's Board twelve years, and North Carolina's Woman's Board six years. The influence of her godly life, and great devotion to the Mission cause will live on and on in the lives of those who were touched by hers. Her record was a brilliant one; her entire life was nobly lived. It seems fitting that this period of our Convention's history should end here today while we are thinking of the one who paved the way for us, and made many achievements possible.

Mrs. Raye V. Knight read the Recommendations of the Woman's Board to the Convention (which appear later in these minutes as the adopted report of the Recommendations Committee), following which Mrs. W. E. Wisseman and Mrs. Robert Lee House spoke—presenting, very effectively, the proposed Thank Offering and Life Membership and Memorials projects, respectively.

The report of the Friendly Service Chairman, Mrs. W. E. Wisseman, was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF FRIENDLY SERVICE CHAIRMAN

In the first year of this closing biennium, 1951-'52, the women of our societies sent Friendly Service gifts to the following groups:

1. The Migrants

- 2. Ryder Memorial Hospital in Puerto Rico
- 3. Franklinton, N. C.
- Fort Berthold Mission 4.

5. Lebanon

A service of dedication was prepared and sent to each society to use as they dedicated their gifts.

This past year, 1952-'53, societies were asked to send gifts to Ellis Island and to Miss Corrinne Nordquist in Africa. A Christmas party program was prepared and most societies in the Convention held a party with gifts for Ellis Island. In addition many societies are now sending gifts to Africa.

For the new year, we are suggesting our work in Puerto Rico:

1. The churches

The hospital The farm

Definite suggestions for gifts will be included in the packet.

We also suggest the use of Share Parcels to help India help herself.
We will continue to emphasize Coupons for the Orphanage and the sending of materials to Miss Oline Nicholson in India.

Following announcements by the host pastor, Dr. H. E. Robinson, Dr. W. T. Scott brought greetings to the Convention from Mrs. Scott (hospital patient), and the afternoon session was adjourned.

TUESDAY—DINNER MEETING

At 6:00 p. m. a Fellowship Dinner was held, with Mrs. W. E. Wisseman, Vice-President, presiding.

Group singing was led by Mrs. D. B. Harrell, Jr.

Mrs. Harold Ingle, President of the Woman's Society of the host church, welcomed those present.

Greetings from the Southern Convention Layman's Fellowship were brought by Mrs. J. Earl Danieley.

Mrs. Carl Wallace and Mrs. Eleanor Wheeless presented an original skit telling of the School of Missions.

Facts concerning the Church Building Loan Fund were presented by Mr. Martin Garren and Dr. Henry Robinson.

Miss Luuk Groot, student at Elon College, delighted those present when, dressed in native Dutch costume, she spoke as "A Friend From Another Country."

TUESDAY—EVENING SESSION

The evening session was called to order by Mrs. W. B. Williams, President, and following a hymn Mrs. John G. Truitt, President of the Southern Convention Mission Board and a past president of the Woman's Convention, led in prayer, after which the choir of the host church sang the anthem, "O Divine Redeemer."

Dr. W. T. Scott introduced Dr. Henry Smith Leiper, Minister and Executive Secretary of the Missions Council, who brought the evening's address on "The Life and Task of the Church Around the World."

Following the offering which was presented as a "love gift" to the McKnights for their work in Japan, the Convention was adjourned with Benediction by Dr. Leiper.

WEDNESDAY—MORNING SESSION

The Wednesday morning session opened with songs by the children of the Kindergarten of the Burlington Church, following which Mrs. Carl Dawson led in prayer.

Mrs. Williams read her report as President of the Woman's Convention, which was accepted, as follows:

"REJOICING IN OUR TASK" Report of the President

One can hardly imagine the number of duties that fall into the hands of the president of such an organization as we represent here today; and I would not try to list the number of things I have done, nor give you the statistics of the various meetings I have attended, as well as the hundreds of letters written, and the thousands of pieces of mimeographed materials

that have passed through my hands during the past biennium.

Many of you do not realize the number of agencies of the church one automatically becomes involved in as the leader of this organization—and how interesting the work becomes. How I wish I had at my command the words to impart to you some of the great thrill and the spirit of humility that has come to me as I have represented you at national, area, convention-wide, conference, and even the smallest of the district meetings.

How proud I was to attend the Mid-Winter Meetings of the Missions Council and there share with the other women state presidents information regarding our women's work in the Southern Convention. What an opportunity it was to sit in those meetings and see the whole mechanical operation of our denomination unfold before my eyes, as well as sharing in the great spiritual experiences of the group. You will never know what a feeling of warmth and gratitude came to me as I stood with the other state presidents on the platform of that huge auditorium in Claremont, California, Woman's Gift. It was indeed with an humble spirit that I shared in this service—realizing that in many instances a part of the \$9,745.88 our Southern Convention women had contributed in "over and above" gifts were truly sacrificial dollars—a love gift that helped swell the National Woman's Gift for 1950-1952 to \$226,000.

But even that moment at the meeting of the General Council did not overshadow the great experience that was mine in the Spring of 1952 when I had the privilege of attending each district meeting in our Woman's Missionary Convention. For it was there that I had the opportunity to talk with you in small groups, and to meet representative women of nearly all our churches in the Convention.

As I have tried to lead you in the promotion of all phases of our work I have been mindful of the fact: "An organization of church women exists to help women cultivate the spirit of Christ, beginning with in their own lives and reaching out into home and community and the uttermost parts of the earth."

What a tremendous task is ours—this task to which our 600,000 Congregational Christian Women belonging to our National Fellowships are dedicated, but it is a task in which we can all rejoice.

The reports that are being made by our various officers here at this meeting will show that our women in the Southern Convention have been "Building With Love and Gratitude" as they traveled the Highway that would ultimately lead them, and others, to their Master.

Now, as we soon close the door on the 1951-1953 biennium at the same time we open the door of the 1953-1955 biennium. As we rejoice in tasks accomplished, let us look forward to new tasks that will present themselves —for never before have women had such opportunities for dedicated Christian service as they find in every path of life today. And let us remember that no matter how shall we consider our own task it has a very vital part in the total program of our Master's Plan.

In "A Task and Program Statement" prepared for the Mid-Winter Meeting of the Missions Council (1953) we find these words:

"Our task and responsibility . . . will require that all of us and each in his own place and way will need to make his contribution as members of one team under our Divine Master. "It all goes together" because "In Him," as Paul told the church at Colossae, "all things stand together as parts of a related whole." We are a fellowship whose strength depends upon our willingness to share responsibility in hard tasks to which only our sense of obligation can compel us . . . Let us constantly recall that what we propose and do we do in concert, as parts of a mighty fellowship which reaches deep and wide, from where we sit clear around the world."

May God give us strength and courage to continue in His Way—"Rejoicing In Our Task."

The following reports of the Department Superintendents and Committee Chairmen were read and adopted:

REPORT OF CRADLE ROLL SUPERINTENDENT

The Cradle Roll Department is no less important than any phase of our church work in the Southern Convention for it is here that the seeds

of missions are planted.

During the 1951-'53 biennium there has been much activity in this department. Reports have been received from 54 active departments totaling 1,117 enrolled. We have study books and through interest created by such study \$548.50 has been sent to missions through the Cradle Roll Department.

Programs and materials for use in the June Cradle Roll Party were included in the Woman's Packet which went to every local society in the Convention. In 1952 we worked with the Friendly Service Department in arranging a Christmas Party for the Cradle Roll centering around the theme of "Ellis Island Immigrants." Gifts were sent to Ellis Island to be distributed to immigrant children in residence there.

This department endeavors to keep a current list of good reading materials for both parents and teachers and once a year this list is sent to

local societies.

To say that this report tells the true story of Cradle Roll activity in the Southern Convention would be incorrect. Many of our churches are doing fine work with the Cradle Roll children but do not consider it a department. Perhaps there are churches which use our literature and materials that we do not know about. It is the aim of this department to have active Cradle Roll work in every church in the Southern Convention and to make available to them materials and books which will help them to lead the children into their rightful place as Christian leaders of tomorrow.

REPORT OF YOUNG PEOPLE'S SUPERINTENDENT

A part of the heritage of every young person in the Congregational Christian Church is a knowledge of the great world wide fellowship of which he is a part. The women of our convention have a grave responsibility in helping make this possible. Beginning with the nursery department on never wavering in our responsibility until our youth become adults and then the strong groups must help the weak. As I think of the material available, written and presented in such an interesting manner for our

young people, I feel that we are failing in our mission unless we see that the young people of our church groups have this material made available for them.

The young people of our churches have had a part in many phases of our mission program. The outstanding mission project of the Pilgrim Fellowship of the Convention during the biennium was the bringing of a young man, Jose Dabuet, from the Philippines to study at Princeton Theological Seminary. \$1,250 was given for this project. This year their gifts for foreign missions will be for a project in West Africa to assist a native teacher in her work. The home mission project is Moonelon and the Carroll County Mission. You will see from the treasurer's report that our youth have had a share in the thank offering for Japan Christian University and church extension at Carroll County, Virginia. The Pilgrim Fellowship has also shared in the aid given Franklinton Center, in the form of Life Memberships and Memorials.

Other activities include Work Day For Christ, the money earned going to missions. One group of young people after hearing Miss Nicholson tell of her work in India were inspired and sent a check to Miss Miriam Brown at Lucy Perry Noble Institute, for the education of a little girl thirteen years of age from the famine area. The North Carolina and Virginia Conference Youth Fellowship bought hymnals for Jose Dabuet to use in his work in the Philippines.

Forty of our youth groups have participated in the friendly service projects designated by the Woman's Convention, including clothing for Ryder Memorial Hospital, Puerto Rico, surgical gauze, gowns, layettes for Dr. Lora Dyer Mission Hospital, Philippine Islands and needed materials for Miss Jennie Pratt on Ellis Island.

Thirty-seven youth groups have used the mission study books, with guides for suggested activities. It was my privilege to teach the mission study book, "Looking South" at Summer Conference at Elon. Thirty young people attended this course and outlined plans for their mission program for the year.

At each state rally some emphasis has been given to the mission program of the Pilgrim Fellowship. We have had some very interesting speakers. Mrs. Dela Udvornoki, from Africa, Mr. Piediscolze, National Pilgrim Fellowship President, and our own Mrs. Charlie Johnson from Suffolk, Virginia, also others I have failed to mention.

From reports received we have several new Pilgrim Fellowship organizations, including: Hopewell, Hope Mills, Monticello, Berea, Beverley Hills, reorganization of the group at Waverly and a young adult group, college age, at Christian Temple, Norfolk.

In thinking over our progress and failures I would like to suggest the following:

- Please, when you purchase your material for your woman's organization at the School of Missions at Elon in June, remember your youth organizations, their material will be on sale also.
- 2. Encourage your youth to attend summer conferences, state rallies, retreats, other events planned to enrich their Christian growth.

In the preface of her book "Our Country India," Rebecca Wells Loeffler wrote:

"These are the young people who constitute the India that can be. In no other country in the world is there a greater need for vision to keep life sweet or for patience to be will to cut the steps that others may climb."

This is our task that we might encourage and inspire the youth of our land.

May God bless you as we undertake this task together.

- 2. If you are responsible for sending in plans for a meeting, please do so in ample time for the announcement to get to the readers of The Sun in time for them to make plans to attend the meeting. You must remember that I am supposed to have material in to the publisher by the Friday before the Thursday on which the paper is published. And, furthermore, you must remember that in many cases that issue does not reach its readers until the week after its publication date.

My job as Convention Editor differs from some of the other departments in that it means work every week. Your help is greatly appreciated.

SPIRITUAL LIFE SUPERINTENDENT

"To worship is to quicken the conscience by the holiness of God, to feed the mind with the truth of God, to purge the imagination by the beauty of God, to open the heart to the love of God, to devote the will to the purpose of God."

The above quotation from "The Hope of a New World" by William Temple declares the aim of any Spiritual Life Department.

Throughout the past biennium our Spiritual Life has been undergirded by our Bible Study. Through study we do truly feed the mind with the truth of God.

In 1951-'52 the recommended Bible Study was a study of the book of James aided by the use of "Applied Christianity" by Samuel Glasgow. Miss Lucy Steele set our feet very firmly on a spiritual "Highway for Our

God" (our theme for the year) with her very inspirational teaching of our Bible Study at the School of Missions.

During 1952-'53 our study of Colossians has been led by a Leader's Guide prepared by Joseph M. Gettys.

In 1953-'54 our recommended study will be "Mirrors of the Soul" prepared by Wallace M. Alston. This is a devotional study based on eight selected Psalms, its purpose being to help us find a new reality in personal and corporate worship. Through these Psalms we are led to see our own experiences reflected and we are challenged to allow these Hebrew poems to quicken our imagination, deepen our insights, stimulate our thinking and renew our devotion to God. I also commend to you "Portraits of the Master" by Robert A. Lapsley, Jr. Help for living in these days should be the result of this study.

Before me are the reports I have received from District Superintendents during the past two years. I would share with you the heartening fact that all of our womn's societies list a planned devotional service at each meeting. A large majority of our societies have held their Bible Study either as a group study, devotional service, or personal devotions. Some groups have not used the Bible Study and several list no spiritual life chairman. May I urge you to remember the importance of this particular phase of our women's work. The function of our women's societies is different from that of clubs and other community organizations. Worship is primary. The devotional life of each woman should be so strengthened and enriched through her membership in the woman's organization that she finds herself ready to meet the routine tasks and emergencies of each day and eager to share her spiritual treasure and her possessions with others. The use of hymn and the Lord's Prayer at a meeting is not worship, but is likely to be the inevitable end for a group that does not have a Spiritual Life Chairman willing to spend time and thought in helping to plan the year's program. May one of our aims be for a new year to find every society with a chosen spiritual life chairman, a planned devotional service and using the recommended Bible Study.

May every woman through her spiritual life—personal and as part of the larger group—grow more aware of God's presence. May this awareness lead her to lift her heart in praise and thanksgiving, to bow in confession and petition, to renew her dedication to His purpose; By so doing she will find herself strengthened in spirit and each day will find her truly rejoicing in her task.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INTERDENOMINATIONAL COOPERATION

As a church finds strength in giving to the wider work of the denomination by supporting its missionary program, so, our church women are continually finding strength in cooperating with other denominations in programs of Christian fellowship, worship, and the support of united

projects.

Our women are increasingly participating in the three Interdenominational observances sponsored by the Council of Church Women—The World Day of Prayer, World Community Day, and the May Fellowship Day. The World Day of Prayer service was held by most of our churches and the report was good. The committee though has no way of finding out whether the World Community Day and the May Fellowship Day were observed with other denominations or just with another group of our own denomination. Our churches have been very generous with their contributions of material things for World Community Day but were not too enthusiastic in participating in the Program for Peace planned for that observance. "Bundles" without our prayers for Peace are like a gift given away without the spirit of love.

The Council of Church Women has as its purpose "to strengthen the bond of Christian fellowship, to unify denominations, nationalities, and races and thus make possible the united voice and action of church women." Thus as chairman of this committee I urge our women to work together on an interdenominational level and thus unify our protestant women in a study of those factions working in our world against our protestant

ideals.

REPORT OF CHRISTIAN FAMILY LIFE

There is an increasing appreciation within the churches of the Southern Convention of the unique importance of family life in the growth of Christian character and faith. The activities of many churches are planned to consider the entire family from the smallest to the grandmother. For the last few years there is much that is exciting and new in the family program and materials of churches, denominations and interdenominational agencies. Many of our Sunday Schools use the Pilgrim Series, with the material each quarter you find planned programs where families may participate as a family group. Many of our families are using the family book. The home book this last fall quarter was a Bible Quiz Book. This activity furnishes fun and pleasure for each member of the family. This year being the completion of the Revised Standard Version of the Bible, many churches had a Bible exhibit and family night. In this project many churches found the entire community interested and helpful in getting material for the exhibit.

So much of our material for promoting loyalty Sunday and other special days and events has centered around the family. The family has

been encouraged to worship together at the regular church service, to make their "Church pledge" as a family. Many of our churches provide church nurseries for the little ones, so that no one is prevented from attending church, also devotional material for National Family Week, films have been shown promoting better family relations, family camps, a home committee for shut-ins, grandmothers tea, family Christmas party and one church had a strawberry festival.

The Family Life Travel Library has been used by some of our families in the Convention and is still available to those interested, it will be sent on request. This library is made possible by the Division of Christian

Education, 19 S. La Salle Street, Chicago, Ill.

Activities in the home this committee has tried to promote, include:

family worship, Christmas Eve Home Service, and grace at meal time.

Seventy-two of our churches in the Southern Convention observed National Family Week this past May 4-10. The theme for the week, "Brotherhood Begins At Home." Many homes were reached through the Christian Sun with suggestions and devotionals for this observance and other special days. The program chairman of the Woman's Convention has provided us with a program for National Family week, found in the packet. Many helpful suggestions come from the Guide Post, our National news sheet.

VISUAL AIDS DEPARTMENT

The most enthusiastic report that I can make for the Visual Aids Department is in the realm of and the hope for the future. The promise there is great. We have scarcely tapped our resources. A wealth of education

awaits those who will dare to probe the wonderful opportunities.

A quick glance at the statistical reports from the local societies to the District Superintendents for the first half of he biennium is proof enough that the reports are not an adequate index of facts. Evidently, more emphasis has been given to the "blanks" than to the reports. There were 131 societies listed but only 40 indicated the use of either films or slides. This I cannot believe to be a true picture, especially since the same report says that there are 20 societies in our Convention that own their Visual Aid equipment, and since a report from our Convention office says that requests for Visual Aid materials are on the increase. The feature film, "A Wonderful Life" had only 11 openings according to the reports, or to the "blanks." The runner ups were "More for Peace" and "Family Life." (Five showings each). The reports for the second half of the biennium have not reached me. Here's hoping that they will reveal the true facts and that we can report a wider use of Visual Aids in our Convention. Somehow, from verbal reports, I have gathered the feeling that we are doing a much better job than these reports would lead us to believe. Moral . . . let's fill in the "blanks."

REPORT OF LITERATURE CHAIRMAN

Your Literature Committee has selected and prepared materials each year in an attempt to produce a packet which would be inspirational and practical to the local societies. The National Women's Fellowship themes, "A Highway for Our God," 1951-1952, and "Building—With Love and Gratitude," 1952-1953, were used as our themes. This past year we sold 128 packets. Reports on use of these have been most favorable.

We will join with women in Congregational Christian Churches across the country this year in the use of the materials on the theme, "Rejoicing In Our Task." The combined theme for home and foreign missions is "The Life and Task of the Church Around the World." The study books and materials on this theme will be included in our packet also. The packets will be ready for distribution at the School of Missiens in June.

As Chairman of the Committee, I attended practically all of the Board meetings of the Woman's Convention and the three Conferences; the annual Conference meetings and the District Rallies; also meetings in a large number of local societies. Displays of literature and materials were provided at most of the meetings. During the biennium additional materials were mailed and inquiries answered by the hundreds. We have been very pleased with the cooperation of our women in the Convention, Conferences, Districts, and local churches in the production and use of the materials.

Dr. William T. Scott spoke to the Convention on "Our Home Mission Task in the Southern Convention." Mrs. John G. Truitt read the report of the Staley Memorial Scholarship Fund Committee, which was adopted as follows:

The Staley Memorial Scholarship Committee of the Woman's Convention met in the home of the chairman, Mrs. John G. Truitt, Elon College, North Carolina, on April 6. 1953, at 4:00 p. m. Dr. L. E. Smith, Mrs. W. E. Wisseman and Mrs. Truitt of the Committee, Mrs. W. B. Williams, President of the Woman's Convention, and Mrs. W. V. Leathers and Mrs. W. T. Scott, visitors, were present.

The following votes were taken, which will be presented to the Con-

vention in Burlington, North Carolina, April 28, 29, 1953.

Voted to include this preliminary statement in our report: It is understood and agreed by the Trustees of Elon College and the Woman's Missionary Convention of the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches that these particular funds when received by the Trustees of the College become a part of the Trust Funds of the College, the principal of which shall be held inviolate for the purpose for which these funds were secured.

Voted that all cash money in the Staley Memorial Fund in the hands of the Treasurer be invested in Government Bonds in keeping with the authorization of the Woman's Convention. The remainder of this fund is to be allocated as a Scholarship Fund to be used at the discretion of the

Committee.

Voted that when completed the entire fund or investment of \$7,100.00 is to be turned over to Elon College to be administered by the College, and that the College shall confer with the president of the Woman's Convention in administering these funds, and that the College present a report at the Biennial Session of the Woman's Convention.

Voted that the administration of the available funds for the Scholarships be left to the discretion of the College as to the number of students to be assisted annually, the requirements being that the recipients of these funds must maintain a scholastic average of C. So long as this average is maintained the Scholarship may be awarded annually until

graduation.

Voted that these Scholarships be awarded to worthy students who are members of the Congregational Christian Church, preferably those who

plan to go into full time Christian work.

The above, when approved, supplants all previous actions by the Woman's Convention governing uses of the Staley Memorial Fund raised by the Woman's Convention.

The report of the Committee for Timothy Chang and Chinese Ministerial Scholarship was read by Dr. W. T. Scott, and adopted as follows: REPORT OF THE MISSION BOARD COMMITTEE ON TIMOTHY CHANG

AND CHINESE MINISTERIAL SCHOLARSHIP

Timothy S. Chang graduated from the Divinity School of Duke University, receiving the B. D. degree in June, 1951. Ater consultation of the Committee with Timothy, it was agreed that he should study for a year at N. C. State College, in the field of Poultry. Here he excelled in his work. He received the B. S. degree in June, 1952, graduating with high honor. Because of his superior work, his faculty adviser at N. C. State recommended him for a Research Fellowship in the Poultry Department of Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, where he will receive the Master of Science degree in the summer of 1953. The Research Fellowship has paid practically all his expenses at Ohio State.

Timothy has done such good work at Ohio State that he has been offered a Fellowship that will enable him to study for his Ph. D. degree. This offer would defray all his expenses at Ohio State. Timothy has asked the advice of your Committee, and after consultation with Dr. George Shepherd, former missionary to China, we have concluded that Timothy should pursue his further training at Ohio State. This is Timothy's desire, and we are of the opinion that his further specialization will enable him to return to China as a specialist in Poultry and this will place him in a

respected position as a Christian leader.

The American Board has suggested the possibility of Timothy's going to the Philippines Islands for service, but he feels this would put him at a disadvantage when he returns to China. If the Communists are still in

power when he returns, they would doubtless question his motives in going to the Philippines instead of returning to China.

Prior to the offer for further study at Ohio State, Timothy had expressed a desire to work in the Church in the U. S. A. as an assistant pastor, and it is possible that this may be his course should the plan at Ohio State not materialize. Timothy is definitely committed to return to China to work in the Church when the opportunity comes. We would not wish him to go prematurely.

The financial statement below shows a receipt of \$850 from the ABCFM. This represents the balance of \$100 appropriated by the ABCFM towards Timothy's training. We suggest that this amount and the balance held in our account, together with the balance in the "Chinese Student"

Account" held by the Woman's Missionary Convention, be put in a savings account as a fund to assist Timothy in his return to China.

We, your committee on recommendations, beg to submit the following: First—That since our Southern Convention, in line with the thought of our National Woman's Fellowship, has adopted the following four goals, we urge that this Conference also recognize their worth and strive to:

 Further our Christian World Mission by helping establish and strengthen the committee on Missionary Education and Steward-

ship in every local church.

2. Deepen our spiritual life as individuals and as families.

3. Promote in every local church the showing of the feature film "The Hidden Heart."

4. Support in every possible way the Church Building Loan Fund

Campaign.

Third—That since the gifts from our Life Membership and Memorials are designated to Franklinton and there is possibility of this work being carried to Bricks, we recommend that we stress this phase of our giving as contributions toward the renovation of the chapel at Bricks, N. C.

Fourth—That since we are part of our National Woman's Fellowship and since our program includes Bible Study, Personal and Family Spiritual development as well as the mission study, we recommend that we suggest to the Convention, that the name Women's Fellowship of the Southern Convention be used, and in that event this Conference be known as the

Women's Fellowship of the Valley Conference.

Fifth—That since the progress of our Convention aims at an advance rather than retreat and since a necessary step in this direction is increased consecrated giving of our means as well as our talents, we recommend that the Valley Women's Conference accept the suggested goal of \$2500 per biennium and that we make every effort to reach it as each society seizes its opportunity and with the help of our Lord carries its share of the

responsibility.

Sixth—Since we feel the value of the untiring efforts of Miss Pattie Lee Coghill cannot be expressed in words, and since the installation of the new soundscriber will in some degree, make her work a bit lighter, we recommend that as a small token of our appreciation the Valley Women's Conference make a gift of not less than \$50 on the price of this equipment. We further recommend that this be raised by individual societies and suggest that pledges or gifts be received at this Conference session.

WAVERLY DISTRICT REPORT

The women of the Waverly district have, during the past year, been building with love and gratitude in many ways. Our lives have been enriched because we have strived to build for Christ in our own lives as well as in our homes, churches, communities and in the world.

The Waverly district is made up of twelve churches; Barrett's, Bethlehem (Disputanta), Burton's Grove, Centerville, Dendron, Hopewell, New Lebanon, Richmond, Spring Hill, Union (Surry), Wakefield and Waverly.

We have seven Women's Missionary societies with a combined membership of 121 and two other societies with mixed-age membership classified as young people but working on Women's Achievement Goals. There are four churches reporting active young people's organizations, four having missionary education and giving for their children and two have an active cradle roll.

As we have been building we have been preparing ourselves for greater task ahead through reading good literature, "The Christian Sun", Church Woman, Advance and Guide-Post, our recommended study books; seeing films that have been informative, challenging and inspiring. From the study of Colossians we have been strengthened spiritually.

Christian Family Life has been stressed in the Waverly district. Seven churches observed National Family Life Week, special family life activities were carried on in ten of our churches.

Our societies have shared at home and abroad through interdenominational as well as Congregational Christian Projects. At home we helped in community projects, at Patrick Henry Hospital, The Children's Home Society, Ellis Island Immigrants and in our own Elon Christian Orphanage.

At our spring rally in Waverly Miss Theim presented the missionary work that is being carried on in the Caroline Islands in such a vivid and fascinating manner that a large number of the societies worked on this foreign project. Ryder Memorial Hospital in Puerto Rico also received gifts from our district.

Nine societies contributed to the missionary work in Carroll county through the Thank Offering. Several societies were helped in presenting this project by the use of slides belonging to Rev. J. W. Madren showing senes from Carroll County. Mr. Madren's explanations as he showed the slides helped to make one feel he had really visited the parish.

Four societies helped the work at Franklinton Center through gifts of money given as memorial to honor deceased members.

Our church women and young people have found great inspiration through the programs of Christian fellowship, worship and the support of united projects with other denominations. Seven churches observed World Day of Prayer, five—World Community Day and six—May Fellowship. Dendron and Richmond are our two churches active in a local council of church women.

The Waverly district has three societies that completed all of the achievements goals; Waverly, Wakefield and Dendron.

Missionary organizations such as ours have a vital place in the life of the church around the world. The task is tremendous, we must have faith in God and mankind. Let us re-dedicate our lives to the service of our Master, let us meditate and pray. The task calls for our time, tithes and talents.

REPORT OF THE NORFOLK DISTRICT SUPERTINTENDENT

The reports from the Societies in the Norfolk District indicate this year, that the theme: "Building With Love and Gratitude", has been universally followed with the result that the activities of the Societies have been increased and their interest in Missions broadened.

There are 12 churches in the Norfolk District and 12 organized Societies with an enrollment of 558 women. The Societies were well represented at th Conference last fall and at the Spring Rally. A Thank Offering service was presented in 11 of the 12 societies and nine of them reported having

reached the Goals of Achievement.

A well planned devotional service was presented at each meeting of eleven of the Societies and this same numbr met the requirements of the

Bible and Mission Study.

There are nine Young People's Societies in the Norfolk District and 25 young people attended the Summer Conference. Eight Children's Societies were reported and seven of them used the Mission Study books and Conference or Convention materials. Nine Cradle Roll groups reported an enrollment of 190.

The Societies in the Norfolk District reaching the Goals of Achievement were: Bay View, Christian Temple, Little Creek, Rosemont, Second, South Norfolk, Newport News, First (Portsmouth) and Shelton Memorial.

It has been a good year among our Societies in Norfolk and we look forward to the coming year's work under the leadership of our new District Superintendent.

SUFFOLK DISTRICT

My appreciation goes to the members of the 19 churches in the Suffolk District who have faithfully met the work this year and make this report possible.

According to the record we have an increase of women enrolled in our societies with a combined membership of 1038. Let us pause and think of what the potential strength of over a thousand Christian women could be: "To further our Christian World Mission by helping to establish and strengthen the committee on Missionary Education and Stewardship in every local church." That is one of the major goals for 1953-54 you know, and the place to begin is in your local church.

Each of the 19 churches in the Suffolk District has an organized missionary society; followed the program outlined by the Convention and paid their apportionment in full. To show the interest manifested in our Mission program three churches are asking for an increase in their apportionment for next year, namely Eure, N. C., Mt. Carmel and Oakland.

I believe the School of Missions has helped to give our women a broader vision of our total program, as well as a big aid in getting the years work under way early. A well informed group is an interested group. We had thirty representatives from this District to attend the School of Missions.

The Spring Rally at Cypress Chapel on April 1st 1953 was one of the highlights of the year. The church was packed: Miss Hilde Thiem was the featured speaker on the theme, "Is It Nothing To You?" The congregation was so moved by her message that the Superintendent's Forum for the afternoon session was set aside and Miss Theim was asked to speak to the group again.

It has been a real joy to work with the women in the Suffolk District for the past two years. Now I ask for Mrs. L. H. Wilroy, your new Superintendent, the same loyalty and cooperation that you gave me so that we may go forward in the building of His Kingdom.

This year, as we have been "building—with love and gratitude", I believe that in the Spiritual Life phase of our women's work we have found the inspiration and encouragement to build according to the Master-Builder's plan.

In the reports that have come to me every society reporting lists a Spiritual Life Chairman, each society reports a planned devotional at each meeting, and each has engaged in the suggested Bible Study.

This is gratifying; and I am sure that we believe with Paul—as he so emphatically wrote to the Church at College—and as the author of our study guide so vividly pointed out, that "being delivered into the Kingdom of Jesus' followers means that one has greater responsibilities along with his greater privileges."

And how best to equip ourselves for meeting these responsibilities?

Your Spiritual Life Committee suggests that we continue our practice of: having a Spiritual Life Chairman of each group, presenting a planned and meaningful devotional at each meeting, engaging in the suggested Bible Study for the year; and we would further suggest that we;

Encourage family worship in our homes (establish Family Altars in our own homes and encourage other families to do likewise), engage in personal daily devotions (take time out from our busy daily routine—we can all find a few minutes — to engage in quiet thought and meditation with our Master), reach new and unchurched women (men and children, too) in our community and bring them into the fellowship of our church, and be faithful in our own church attendance.

Our Bible Study for the new year—Mirrors Of The Soul, by Wallace Alston,—based on eight selected Psalms will be found excellent for personal devotions as well as group study. (Why not present copies to "shut-in" members of your Woman's group?) As we study these Psalms we will see reflected in them our own experiences and will realize anew that all of life is lived under the eye of God and is to be reckoned in the light of His fellowship and will.

In the packets this year are found suggested methods of teaching our Bible Studies. Lets vary our presentation—employ a new method occasionally.

Helps for our devotions may be found from many sources. I would urge you to make use of Guide Posts, Advance, and The Christian Sun. You will find good devotional materials listed in the little booklet "Adventures In

Reading"—a copy of which is included in the packet.

May each of us, through our Spiritual Life, grow more aware of God's presence. May we "lift our hearts in praise and thanksgiving, bow in confession and petition, renew our dedication to His purpose and be strengthened in spirit" so that each day will find us "rejoicing in our task" of worshipping Him with our whole heart and serving Him with our whole strength.

FAMILY LIFE

By placing children within families, God has given the home a sacred trust. By placing families within the fellowship of Christ's Church, God has made the church responsible for interpreting to parents the spiritual nature of their task, and for assisting them to succeed in doing it well. I believe the family and church are drawing closer together in this task. The church on its part is making a large place for the family. This is evident in the promotional material for special events and the all church projects, for our

Sunday Schools.

This is the twelfth year the churches of America have observed National Family Week. The theme this year, "A Christian Foundation for Every Home." Thirty churches in our conference observed National Family Week. This year many of our churches used the suggestions given in program manual of Pilgrim Series for an all Church project, "A Bible Exhibit" and family night. Another church had as an all church project, "A Family Praise Festival," other churches had covered dish suppers with programs and some churches distributed family life leaflets. Other programs have been carried out in the homes sponsored by the church through the Woman's societies such as, Family Devotionals, special home services for different holidays of the year, and some Sunday Schools have placed the Family books in the homes of the parish, which may be orderd with Pilgrim Series material.

The first step each year, in planning, should be a conference with the minister and Christian Family Life chairman, to see how as a woman's organization, we might cooperate in a complete program for the promoting

of Christian Family Life in our church.

I would like to offer the following suggestions:

 Register with Division of Christian Education, Paul Reynolds, Secretary, Family Life and Young Adult Work, 19 South La Salle Street, Chicago, Ill., for free material and also leaflets, for a small fee, giving suggestions for Family Worship and suggestions for observing National Family Life Week.

2. Promote the use of Family booklets, with Pilgrim Series.

3. Encourage special services in the home, such as family devotions, Christmas Eve Home Service, grace at meal time, a greater participation as a family, in the total program of the church.

4. Make more of National Family Week in your church, by planning

events for each day of the week, either in the home or at church

in a special program.

We seek God's blessing, as we strive to reaffirm that which is good, to recognize that which is inadequate, and to gain new insights which will enable us to live more creatively, one with another.

FRIENDLY SERVICE

The women of Eastern Virginia heard the call to serve in a friendly way the many strangers who were detained on Ellis Island. Here our beloved Mrs. Jennie Pratt, a representative of our Congregational Christian Churches, moved among these strangers with friendly hands and a message of hope until they were strangers no longer. The churches were almost 100 per cent in the Ellis Island Project.

Miss Corrine Nordquest in Johannesburg, South Africa, was also re-

membered by many churches.

Of course we want to continue the project of sending coupons to the Christian Orphanage at Elon College. The coupons are valuable regardless of the date.

Patrick Henry Hospital (for the chronically ill) was chosen as a community Service Project by several of the churches. Committees have taken religious booklets, magazines and food to the patients.

Each and every church remembered its sick and shut-ins (very often its needy) in a friendly way.

Our new project for the coming year is a most interesting one. I know we are going to get a lot of fun out of collecting our Goat Fund, naming our goat and shipping it off to Puerto Rico.

Again Mrs. Wisseman has planned a very fine Christmas Program which you will find in your Packet. There again the children will find that they can share in friendly service gifts to Ryder Memorial Hospital with a collection of cakes of ivory soap, picture scrapbooks for children at the clinic, bedside slippers of terry cloth (small sizes). Some groups can have vitamin showers. (Vitamin tablets and powdered milk). The health problem in Puerto Rico is great. That is why the women are concentrating on "The Goat." Goat's milk is nourishing. We can send a purebred pedigreed goat to a family in Puerto Rico for thirty dollars (\$30.00) and he can pick up a living on poor land. Many of the boys and girls have never tasted milk. This will make it possible for them to have milk to drink and use in cooking. Quoting from Mrs. Wisseman, "Thus our dollars turn into goats, then into milk, then into healthy children and healthy families."

Every woman in the Southern Convention, I am sure, wants to have a share in giving these boys and girls in Puerto Rico their first drink of milk. In order to do this we must begin to plan and to collect our nickles and dimes in each society now. If we get more than is needed for the goat, there is much needed farm equipment in the Rural Life Center. First we must get our thirty dollars for our goat, then we have the privilege of naming the goat. Then when Christmas comes we will be ready to use our program and dedicate our gifts.

Following Dr. Lauback's method each one tell one about our "Goat Fund." May we really have a Friendly concern for our neighbors to the south of us.

Dr. William T. Scott told us about the promising prospects of a new church in South Boston, Va. Two or three meetings, at which time Conference officials and interested parties, discussed this possibility have already been held. These meetings have been most encouraging. Dr. Scott expressed his feeling that this new work should be given our immediate consideration.

Dr. Henry Robinson also talked briefly on this same matter. He too, felt that here was a real opportunity for church extension

whch we should do something about as soon as possible.

After further discussion on this matter by several C. M. A. members the motion was made and carried that the C. M. A. take on the South Boston work as its project for the year 1953-54. Included in this motion was the statement that we try to raise at least \$1,000 to be used toward purchasing a building site for the new

church or toward the construction of the building itself.

The response to this motion was most enthusiastic. It was suggested that we try to get as many memberships towards this project as we could from the floor during this session. Acting on this suggestion around \$700.00 was raised in cash and pledges. The Greensboro church and the Elon Community church each pledged \$100. Hopedale church pledged \$75.00; Howard's Chapel, Beverly Hills, Union (N. C.) each pledged \$50.00, while individual memberships accounted for the rest of the above amount.

After reporting this good beginning on the South Boston project the chairman called for a special effort toward raising the full amount on this project by the end of this Conference year. We

feel, that with your help, this goal can be reached!

On Wednesday morning November 11th the C. M. A. was again called into session at which time the following officers were elected:

Kenneth D. Register, President. Dwight Jackson, Vice-Presdent. Mrs. W. E. Briggs, Secretary and Treasurer. The C. M. A. then adjourned to meet again on Tuesday, Nov. 16th, 1954 at the First Congregational Christian Church of Greensboro, N. C.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION 2:00 P. M.

The session was called to order by President Stevens by the singing of the Convention Hymn, "God of Grace and God of Glory."

The meeting was constituted by prayer by Dr. I. W. Johnson.

A cordial welcome was extended by the pastor of the host church, Rev. R. E. Brittle.

The President declared a quorum present.

Introduction of new ministers and guests by Superintendent Scott:

Stevens, president of Grinnell College, Grinnell, Iowa, addressed the Laymen's Fellowship on the subject: "Tomorrow's Challenge to Higher Education." Dr. Raymond A. Dudley, India secretary of the American Board, spoke to the Women of the Convention on "Women in India."

Both audiences were up to the capacity of the banquet halls.

TUESDAY EVENING SESSION

The evening session was led in worship by the chaplain, including special music by the host church choir.

An offering was received for Korean Relief.

Dr. Stanley U. North was the speaker of the evening, giving a stirring address on "The Life and Task of the Church in America."

The Lord's Supper was administered by Dr. Timmons and Rev. Mr. Brittle.

WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION

The session was opened by hymn and prayer by Rev. George D. Alley.
The report of the Executive Board was adopted and made part of the Record. Exhibit 1.

It was voted to make the actions of the Executive Board during the 1952-54 biennium the official actions of The Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, Inc.

On motion it was voted that the report of the Superintendent be adopted and made a part of the record and that the recommendations be referred to the Business Committee. Exhibit 2.

The report of the Educational Secretary was adopted and made a part of the record. Exhibit 3.

On motion it was voted that the Treasurer's report be received and referred to the Finance Committee. Exhibit 4.

On motion it was voted that the report of the Mission Board be made part of the record and that the following recommendation be referred to the Business Committee. Exhibit 5.

"We recommend that our churches support the CBLF and that the Convention quota of \$135,000 be fully subscribed. To that end we request that the Mission Board be permitted to continue to contact the churches not yet having made their Declarations of Purpose."

In accordance with the above vote, the following resolutions presented by the Business Committee (at the afternoon session) were adopted:

Be it Resolved:

- 1. That we adopt the report of the CBLF Campaign Committee with commendation to the Committee.
- 2. That the Mission Board be authorized to seek "Declarations of Purpose from churches not yet having made "declarations," and to complete the quota of \$135,000.00.

It was especially noted that \$14,298.00 was given to the National Home Board for Ministerial Relief and that the beneficiaries of the Southern Convention area received back a total of \$18,500.00. An expression of gratitude to our National Board for its generous gifts was extended.

On motion it was voted that the report of the Board of Christian Education be adopted and made a part of the record. The Convention authorized the Board of Christian Education to prepare such a charter as is necessary and to make the charter conform to the present structural organization of the Board. Said charter to be presented to the Executive Board for approval. Change of name of the Board of Religious Education is to be mentioned in the new charter. Exhibit 6.

On motion it was voted to adopt the report of the Board of Publications and to make it a part of the record. Exhibit 7.

On motion it was voted to adopt the report of the Rural Church Committee and make it part of the record. Exhibit 8.

On motion it was voted to adopt the report of the Stewardship Commission and to make it part of the record. Exhibit 9.

Dr. D. H. Sandstrom of Chicago, Ill., presented a most inspiring address on "Stewardship, a Personal Discipline."

It was moved and voted that Rev. Z. P. Jenkins be welcomed as a fraternal delegate from the Convention of the South, and that he be seated as a deliberative delegate. He spoke to bring greetings and stressed the importance of presenting the Gospel to a materialistic civilization.

It was voted to make the report of the Finance Committee the first matter of business in the afternoon session.

The report of the Woman's Missionary Convention was adopted and made a part of the record. Exhibit 10.

The report of the Laymen's Fellowship was adopted and made part of the record. Exhibit 11.

The report of the Pilgrim Fellowship was adopted and made part of the record. Exhibit 12.

The report of the Committee on the Ministry was adopted and made part of the record. Exhibit 13.

The report of the Moonelon Committee was again presented with the recommendation that the Convention place this entire holding under the administration and supervision of the Board of Christian Education, with the understanding that the Convention continue to hold the title to the property.

The above report and recommendation were later adopted in the afternoon session. Exhibit 14.

The report on Elon College was presented by President Smith, with adoption postponed until later. A statement by Dr. Stanley C. Harrell in opposition to approving the Trustees' action of borrowing \$650,000.00 from the Federal Government was given. Other statements by Rev. Richard Jackson and Dr. Smith were heard.

An address by Dr. Samuel N. Stevens of Grinnell College, "The Redemptive Power of Christian Education," was heard with sincere appreciation.

The Convention recessed for lunch served by the ladies of the host church.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

A hymn and a prayer by Rev. J. Frank Apple opened the session.

The Business Committee asked that the Elon College report be given the first fifteen minutes of the session. (This time was later extended an additional ten minutes.) It was recommended that Rev. Carl Key of Durham, N. C., be granted five minutes to tell of the program of CROP; also that discussion of the Superintendent's Home be put over to the Thursday session.

The above report of the Business Committee was adopted.

Numerous statements on the Elon College report were made, including Shirley Holland D. R. Fonville, L. E. Smith, I. W. Johnson, Mills Godwin, Wm. T. Scott, Jesse H. Dollar, Earl Danielcy, H. V. Harman and H S. Hardcastle. These men strongly supported favorable action on the

Trustees' application for the \$650,000.00 government loan. H. E. Robinson and Lanson Granger objected to the lack of time given for considering this very important action, also pointing out the undesirability of our College as our educational arm becoming involved with the state as a definite step toward central control of our free institutions.

On motion the report on Elon College, with the recommendation to approve the application for the loan, was adopted and made part of the record. Exhibit 15.

In the above connection, the question was asked if it was necessary for the Convention to grant its approval. The answer was given by Mr. Godwin that such permission was not necessary, that the Trustees had the authority to borrow such monies as they saw fit.

Mr. Pendleton pointed out that the real issue, namely who controlled the college, the trustees or the church, had not been faced.

The Finance Committee presented the various sections of its report separately upon vote of the Convention.

The Annual Apportionments and Budget for the 1954-56 Biennium were adopted.

Item No. 1, the schedule of Conference apportionments, was adopted. Items Nos. 2 through 14, were adopted, with item No. 13 received as information.

On motion of Chairman Stanley C. Harrell, the Finance Committee's report was adopted as a whole. Exhibit 16.

Rev. Carl Key presented his statement on CROP.

The Ministerial Scholarship Fund report was presented and was adopted and made part of the record. Exhibit 17.

On motion, the report of the Committee on Evangelism and Devotional Life was received and made part of the record. This report was later adopted at the Thursday morning session. A supporting statement by Melvin Dollar was heard at that time. Exhibit 18.

On motion the report of the CBLF Campaign Committee was adopted and made part of the record, with special thanks to Mr. Garren and his committee for the excellent job they have done. Exhibit 19.

The report of the Nominating Committee was presented. Exhibit 20.

On motion, the nominations were closed and the Secretary was instructed to cast one ballot for the slate of nominees. The Secretary cast the ballot as instructed, and the President declared the nominees elected.

The recommendations of the Nominating Committee were presented.. No. 1 of these recommendations was interpreted to be suggestive and only a consensus of this Convention meeting.

The report of the Christian Orphanage was submitted by Superintendent John G. Truitt, and it was adopted. (Auditor's reports for the years of 1952 and 1953 were placed in the hands of the Secretary.) Exhibit 21.

The Convention recessed for supper served by the ladies of the church.

WEDNESDAY EVENING SESSION

Worship was conducted by the chaplain.

Mr. Jerry Smyre of Elon College rendered a concert of sacred music. The offering was received for the Department of Music of Elon College, amounting to \$51.19.

A most stimulating and informative address by Dr. Raymond A. Dudley, secretary for India of the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions, followed: "The India in Which We Work."

THURSDAY MORNING SESSION

The session was opened by a hymn with the invocation being given by Rev. M. A. Pollard.

On motion the report of the Committee on Memoirs was adopted and made part of the record. Exhibit 22.

On motion the report of the O'Kelly Memorial Foundation was adopted and made part of the record. Exhibit 23.

On motion the report of the Historian, given by Dr. Scott, was adopted. Dr. Scott noted the historical sketch in the revised *Manual*.

On motion the report on the Superintendent's Home was adopted and made part of the record. Exhibit 24.

Dr. Scott presented a report on the Group Insurance plan. On motion this report with its recommendations was adopted and made part of the record. Exhibit 25.

The report of the Business Committee was made by Mr. Granger, as follows:

The Business Committee has considered the recommendations made by Superintendent Scott in his report and proposes that the Convention approve them with instructions that the Executive Board implement them as a part of the Convention's program for the next biennium.

The report of the Ministerial Loan Fund was given. (An amendment that Recommendation No. 3 be deleted was lost.) On motion \$1,330.96, as shown in the Elon College general funds, less such additions as have been made since the 1952 session of the Convention was written off. (Thus \$1,165.92 was forgiven.) On motion the report, so altered, was adopted and made part of the record. Exhibit 26.

Dr. Smith's question as to what the Convention would have the College do concerning ministerial student scholarships granted by the College was referred to the Survey Committee on motion passed by the Convention.

On motion the report of the Social Action Committee was adopted and made part of the record. Exhibit 27.

On motion the report of the Committee on Credentiaals was adopted. Exhibit 28.

The Committee on Resolutions reported. The report was adopted and the resolutions admitted to record. Exhibit 29.

The resignation of R. L. Jackson from the Board of Christian Education was accepted. (Mr. Jackson had been elected to the Mission Board and did not desire to serve on two boards.) Mr. Martin Garren of Greensboro was elected to fill the vacancy.

On motion it was voted that the Secretary and President be authorized to complete the Minutes.

On motion it was voted that the Minutes be printed in The Annual and that the actions of the Convention be printed as soon as possible in *The Christian Sun*.

It was voted that the Convention acknowledge with thanks the invaluable service of the Convention Office, especially in the preparation of the "Blue Book" used by this session.

An expression of unanimous appreciation was extended to W. Millard Stevens upon the completion of four years of office as President of the Convention. Dr. Stevens at this point passed down the gavel and cane, symbols of his office, to his successor, Dr. Jesse H. Dollar, who responded with gracious and appropriate remarks.

The concluding service of the 1954 session of the Convention was conducted by the chaplain, following a soul-searching address by Rev. D. H. Sandstrom: "Kindle It with Love."

Final adjournment was at 11:35 a.m.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

Five regular meetings of the Board were held during the Biennium: July 17, 1952, at Henderson, N. C.; November 25, 1952, at Henderson, N. C.; April 23, 1953, at Henderson, N. C.; December 8, 1953, at Suffolk, Va.; February 2, 1954, at Burlington, N. C.; and April 27, 1954, called for Suffolk, Va.

As instructed by the 1952 Convention, the Board authorized the revision of *The Manual* of the Southern Convention and appointed a Revisions Committee to proceed with the work. In January, 1954, the work was completed with the issuance of the revised *Manual*. The same copy is to be placed in cloth binding and issued shortly.

The Building Loan Fund Campaign quota of \$135,000 was accepted and a committee headed by Martin T. Garren was set up to secure Declarations of Purpose from the churches. This work was to be completed by December 31, 1953, but the committee was authorized to finish its work by individual church contact up through the Mission Period of 1954.

A major concern of the Board has been the employing of a Stewardship and Evangelism Secretary. A special committee for job analysis made its report, and the Board's Committee on Office Personnel was instructed to further study the matter and recommend a candidate for the position by Convention time, if possible. A consensus indicates that there is a great need for such a staff person and that the balance in the Convention Fund is sufficient to employ a person at this time.

A Sustaining Fund (Elon College) Committee was appointed to work with all related groups. This committee was convened with College representatives, at which time H. E. Robinson and D. J. Bowden were elected Chairman and Secretary, respectively. Reports of this committee's work are reflected in the Sustaining Fund totals raised as recorded in The Annual.

The property of Moonelon has been administered by the Moonelon Committee, which is responsible to the Board. The Board has acted on several occasions regarding insurance, incorporation, development and future administration of this property. Further details will be found in the Report on Moonelon.

The matter of an edition (partial reprint and unauthorized changes) of the *Principles and Government of the Christian Church* by Rev. W. M. Lake of Burlington, received the attention of the Board. This matter was heard by a personal explanation given by Mr. Lake. It was settled by mutual agreement to destroy all available copies. Future questions concerning this edition were placed in the hands of a special committee, duly appointed.

The audits of the Convention finances for the years ending December 31, 1952, and December 31, 1953, were received and referred to the Finance Committee.

Supt. Scott was designated our delegate to the International Congregational Council at St. Andrews, Scotland, which he attended in June, 1953, being accompanied by Mrs. Scott.

It was voted that the Ministerial Loan Fund Committee of the Convention and the Ministerial Scholarship Fund Committee of the Board of Christian Education meet jointly until the next meeting of the Convention.

The Board voted to accept its share of the General Council travel fund deficit and

to apportion it to the Conferences. The total was \$848.

The Board felt deeply the loss of Dr. Robert Lee House and framed appropriate

resolutions upon his passing.

The Board accepted the invitation of the Bethlehem Church (Suffolk, Virginia) to hold the 1954 sessions of the Convention at that church, and appointed a Nominating Committee to submit a slate of Officers and Board members, etc. to the Convention.

The Finance Committee was asked to make a study of all anticipated needs of the Convention Boards, Institutions and agencies for the next five-year period in order to formulate a picture of future askings in relation to resources of the churches.

In December of 1953, the Board authorized the appointment of a special Survey Committee to make a study of our Institutions, and in consultation with the Finance

Committee, to make appropriate recommendations to the Board.

Mr. John T. Kernodle was appointed Editor ad interim of The Christian Sun. At the resignation of Rev. Duane Vore, Rev. James H. Lightbourne, Jr., was elected to fill this vacancy on the Board of Publications.

Rev. Wm. T. Scott was nominated for reelection as Superintendent of the Con-

vention for the 1954-56 biennium.

The Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Superintendent, and all employed staff of the Convention are bonded through the Board of Home Missions of Congregational Christian Churches, New York, Fidelity Bond—Aetna No. 1F-6634—Blanket Position Bond, \$100,000 indemnity each, premiums paid to June 30, 1954.

At each meeting of the Board held during the course of the biennium, reports have been received in detail from the Superintendent, the Educational Secretary, the Treasurer of the Convention Fund, the Convention Office, and from all of the officers of the Convention. Copies of these reports are in the hands of the Secretary and may be examined by any member of the Convention upon request. Also detailed minutes of each session of the Executive Board are on record in the minute book of the Executive Board, which is a permanent record, in the hands of the Convention Secretary, and may be examined upon request by anyone desiring to examine such records.

The foregoing actions of the Board are a brief summary of the significant actions which the Board has taken. Other actions are included in the minutes mentioned above. At each session of the Board, the Board has also received reports from the various committees of the Convention and has counseled with said committees with reference to their work.

REPORT OF CONVENTION SUPERINTENDENT

THE STATE OF OUR CHURCHES AND MINISTRY:

Churches.—There are 201 churches in the Convention, three new ones being organized during the biennium: Hendersonville and Burlington "Lakeview" in North Carolina; South Boston in Virginia. Oakdale, located at Rig, West Virginia, of the old West Virginia Christian Conference prior to the merger in 1931, sought and received associate membership in the Valley Conference. There are nine "inactive" or non-cooperating churches in the Convention.

Membership.—At the end of the 1952-53 Conference Year, the churches reported 34,889 members, or a gain of 966 over the 1950-51 figure (33,923), reported to the 1952 session of the Convention.

Sunday School Membership.—For the 1952-53 Conference Year, 184 churches reported Sunday School enrollment totaling 26,495 (including 2,431 officers and teachers), a gain in membership of 2,886 in two years.

Properties —In 1953, 197 churches reported properties at \$7,040,639. For the Conference Year 1951-52, 146 churches reported having spent \$603,438 for new buildings and improvement of present properties; for 1952-53, 118 churches reported having spent \$359,051 for the same purposes.

During the biennium, in the Valley Conference, Bethlehem has constructed a beautiful new church; Bethel and Mt. Lebanon are now erecting a new educational

building and church respectively.

In the Eastern Virginia Conference, Rosemont, in South Norfolk, has enlarged and beautified its sanctuary and erected an educational building. Bayview, in Norfolk, and Wakefield have erected educational buildings.

In the Eastern North Carolina Conference our newly organized church at Fayetteville has completed a beautiful chape! and educational building, and Southern Pines has beautified its sanctuary and completed its educational building.

In the Western North Carolina Conference, Hanks Chapel and High Point have

erected educational buildings.

In the North Carolina and Virginia Conference our newly organized Lakeview Church, in Burlington, has erected its first building; Hopedale has completed its new building; Union (N.C.) has completed its educational building; while Beverly Hills, Burlington, has just begun construction of a new church building.

In every Conference, our churches have made substantial improvements on properties, and our facilities are the best in our history for more effective service. In-

debtedness reported is \$456,191.

Parsonages.—There are now 74 parsonages in the Convention, and two under construction (Eastern Virginia, Mt. Carmel; North Carolina and Virginia, New Lebanon). Five new homes for ministers have been added during the past two years: Eastern Virginia—Bethlehem (Nans.), Chapel and Bay View; Eastern North Carolina—Wake Chapel; Western North Carolina—Albemarle. Southern Pines and Suffolk have purchased new parsonages.

Finances.—Our churches have contributed more money to our church cause during the past two years than in any biennium in our history—a total of \$2,671,764: \$2,314,817 for local expenses, including building and improvement to properties, and \$356,947 to apportionment and benevolences.

For example, in the 1952-53 Conference Year, our churches raised \$1,110,323, or about \$32 per member, for local purposes, and \$185,174, or about \$5 per member, for benevolences. From this we get some idea about our stewardship. For that same year the average pastoral salary for "full-time" service was \$3,119.

A comparison of our situation in 1953, as compared with 1933, may be seen from the figures given below. For 1933:

Our Ministry.—We have 131 ordained ministers in the Convention (119 Elders, 9 with Conference Ordination, 19, Licentiates, 19 Candidates—Biblical Class, 3 with standing in other denominations.)

Pastors.—There are 98 pastors—82 ordained; 8 Conference Ordinations; 6 Licentiates; 3 with standing in other denominations. We have 33 young men preparing for the Christian ministry—7 in seminaries and 26 in College (21 at Elon).

Eleven new ministers have come to our Convention during the past two years: George D. Alley, Thomas H. Britton, Harvey L. Carnes, Henry V. Harman, Cameron D. Hayes, Charles M. Heymann, Dwight O. Jackson, Charles M. Jones, W. C. Timmons, H. G. Titcomb, and John S. Graves has returned to the Convention.

Kenneth M. Lindner and Johnson L. Griffin have returned to the U. S. Army Chaplaincy. We have been saddened by the death among our ministerial ranks: Rev. C. E. Newman, Rev. N. G. Newman, Rev. T. J. Green, Rev. R. L. House, and Rev. Rufus Moffitt.

We are glad to have a part in making effective the Group Insurance Plan for our ministers and their dependents. A full report on this work will be given elsewhere.

II. OUR AUXILIARIES, BOARDS, COMMITTEES AND INSTITUTES:

Women's Work.—Approximately 150 churches have Women's societies, with a membership approximating between 3000 and 5000. This is one of our most significant and effective works as a church.

Laymen's Work.—Our Laymen's Fellowship is six years old. There are approximately 10,000 men in our churches. Perhaps no more than 3000 are taking more than a "belonging status" in our churches, but the Laymen's Fellowship is "on the way." Here is perhaps the greatest potential in the Convention.

Youth Work.—The Board of Christian Education and Miss Coghill are developing a significant work with the youth of our churches, as their reports will indicate.

The Boards and Committees of our Convention have their functions and have rendered good service during the biennium, as their reports will reveal. I have served as Executive Secretary of the Mission Board,

Elon College continues to serve our church well. Our constituency should be mindful of the need of more adequate financial support, and more of our own youth should attend our college.

The Christian Orphanage is our Christian witness of our love for the children in our midst who are the victims of orphaned and broken homes. Let us not fail to do our job wisely and generously there.

Moonelon, our Convention Assembly Ground (or Conference Center), is developing under the leadership of our Laymen. This center can be a point of real service and inspiration to our entire constituency.

III. THE CHRISTIAN SUN:

Our church paper since 1844 has rendered a service of fellowship, information and inspiration without which we would be considerably weakened. The report of the Board of Publications will call to our attention the problems of "survival" of

The Christian Sun. More subscriptions constitute the solution to most of the problems.

IV. OUR STEWARDSHIP, EVANGELISM, CHURCHMANSHIP, CHURCH EXTENSION:

Statistically, we are growing, even if at a slow rate! We continue to be disturbed by our very low Evangelism index. For the Conference Year 1952-53, our net increase in membership was only 276. This does not indicate our full Christian passion and concern, we believe. Our potential is many times that figure!

Recommendation.--That we reaffirm the goal of one new member per month

for each 100 members.

Our giving reveals a generosity, and yet our record is far below the Christian Stewardship principles. Read the Stewardship report.

We believe the action to employ a Stewardship and Evangelism Secretary can

be the means of lifting our spiritual devotion, witness and giving.

Our newly organized churches are inspirations. Considerable time has gone into this work. We are gratified with the results, but many other fields await us.

Recomendation.—That we re-rffirm our goal of one new church per year in each Conference.

V. CHURCH BUILDING LOAN FUND CAMPAIGN:

The Southern Convention, through devoted laymen and pastors, has engaged during the past year in the denomination's campaign to raise \$4,500,000. Our quota is \$135,000. To date, approximately \$95,000 has been accepted as quotas by our churches of the Convention. We have received generous support from our Church Building Society, and we shall need greater support as we organize new churches. Our nation needs new churches for its growing millions, and our denomination must not fail in its share of the responsibility to give the Christian witness to our nation's people!

Recommendation.—That the Mission Board be authorized to complete the Church Building Loan Fund goal of \$135,000, and that our churches give their

liberal support to this undertaking.

VI. OUR CENTENNIAL BIENNIUM (1856-1956):

The 1956 biennial session of the Convention will mark 100 years of organization of the Southern Convention (organized at Union Ridge, Burlington). These years have marked many changes, much progress, and give us great hope for the future.

Recommendation.—That 1954-56 be declared our "Convention Centennial"; that we seek an invitation from Union Ridge Church for the 1956 session; that the ensuing biennium be emphasized as our Centennial, and that a Special Committee be appointed to set up goals and objectives for our "Convention Centennial."

VII. IN CONCLUSION:

You have honored me with responsibility as your Superintendent. I have tried to fulfill to the best of my ability those responsibilities. In the above report of activities, plans, etc., there is none in which the Superintendent has not had a part (even if small). The credit for victories, I gladly give to our devoted pastors, officers and leaders. For failures, I assume a full share. That I have given my best is my consolation. I have travelled more than 70,000 miles during the biennium in the interest of our work, counselling with local churches, pastors, boards, committees, institutions, ministerial students, lay persons, etc. No small portion of time goes into counselling with churches with regard to pastoral services. We believe a good spirit of cooperation is prevailing in our Conferences and Convention. We are ready, we believe, for a courageous advance in spirit and in service during the Centennial Biennium. The Convention Hymn expresses my prayer for us all at this hour.

I have served our Convention throughout the General Council as a member of the Executive Committee, representing the Conferences of the Southeast. I have served as a member of the Nominating Committees of the General Council and of the Board of Home Missions, serving also as a member of the Marginal Church Committee of the Board of Home Missions, as a member of the Executive Committee of the N. C. Council of Churches, and in other interdenominational capacities.

Mrs. Scott and I were honored to be your delegates to the International Congregational Council in St. Andrews, Scotland, in June, 1953. Your generous contributions to help make our trip possible is deeply appreciated. We received great inspiration from our denominational world-wide meeting, and the visit to our Church centers in England, Scotland, Ireland, France, Switzerland and Italy gave us a picture of the need for the Christian Witness. We hope these enriching experiences, and your thoughtfulness, have deepened our sense of mission and our effectiveness.

Mention should be made of the young ladies who served our Convention in the office. Their work is nearly all detail and often lacks the "thrills" of field contact that come to Miss Coghill and me. Yet, the devotion of Miss Edna Fitch, who serves as bookeeper and assistant treasurer; Miss Doris Boswell, who serves as Miss Coghill's secretary, and the two college girls who give part time in letter writing and in keeping The Christian Sun mailing list, make for whatever effectiveness we may have had.

EXHIBIT 3

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

I know of no job with more satisfaction in it than mine, and I thoroughly enjoy it. It has its frustrations because no one knows more than I do the number of things which go undone, and the possibilities if there were more time. I long for more time to visit local churches, but our "stated" and group meetings keep me busy. The most difficult part of my job is office work—not that I don't like it, as letters to me are the next best thing to a personal visit, but there seems to be no possible way of catching up with my office work just one time in my life! In addition to the large amount of letters in connection with the promotion of rallies, conferences, leadership training schools, young people's camps and conferences, our office work often seems as extensive as the many organizations and people in our two hundred churches! Such a variety of things as people write us about. I wish I had space to list some of them. There are also requests for program materials for all age groups in our churches and for every season of the year.

Board of Christian Education. While I am an employee of the Southern Convention and report to the Executive Board, it is the Board of Christian Education which pays the major share of my salary, expenses and office secretary, and in a general way supervises my work. Rev. W. J. Andes, Chairman, is always helpful in making decisions. I attend the two or three meetings of the Board which are held each year, when general plans are made and accomplishments reviewed. I have met during the past two years with the committees on Christian Education in most of our Conferences, with some of them several times. I keep in touch with the National Division of Christian Education and provide Pilgrim Press with an up-to-date list of our Sunday School Superintendents for their regular mailings of materials. I receive sample copies of all the materials from the various departments of our Division of Christian Education and in turn, order what we need in our area. I am also in touch with the Division of Christian Education of the National Council of Churches and receive sample copies of all materials published.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTIONS. These are a major interest of the Board of Christian Education. I meet with the Planning Committees in each of these and assist in every way possible in promoting attendance at the Conventions and in securing leadership and helping with the program. Our office also mimeographs the Sunday School report blanks. The ten cents per member from the local Sunday Schools which are sent to the Conventions help very materailly in supporting our Christian Education work. A special Supper Meeting for Sunday School Superintendents has been held in four of the five Conferences during the past few years, and this has been promoted for the most part by the officers of the Sunday School Conventions.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOLS are another concern of the Board of Christian Education. I do not know the exact number which are held in the Convention, but the

number is increasing all the time, and a large majority of our churches hold them. We feel that this is most important because none of us have enough time in our Sunday Schools. For these Vacation Bible Schools we select text books each year, and last year I bought them on consignment for sale at the time of the Women's Rallies. This year the needs of our churches are so different we have suggested four different types of materials which have been passed along to the churches, and from which they may select and order their own. In scattered areas we have held Vacation Church School Institutes to assist teachers and officers in conducting schools. This year the Western North Carolina Youth Rally on the fifth Sunday in May plans to put its entire emphasis on Vacation Bible Schools, hoping to enlist the interest and help of the young people, and there will be a presentation of suggestions for the use of all materials. Selling and collecting and ordering additional materials has been a tremendous job for us each year, and we are hoping that the present way of handling this will be an improvement, at least for our office!

YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK, another concern of the Board of Christian Education, needs more time than I can possibly give to it. I have met with the Southern Convention Youth Fellowship officers in two Planning Conferences during the biennium and there is to be a meeting of delegates from the churches throughout the Convention at First Church, Burlington, with the churches of Alamance County serving as joint hosts, on April 24 and 25. This will be the first time we have attempted this kind of meeting. Each church is being asked to send two official delegates, whether or not they have any kind of youth organization. In addition to the Convention youth work, each of our five Conferences has a thriving youth organization, and all of them have at least two rallies per year. The Western North Carolina Young People meet every fifth Sunday. I attend almost all of these Young People's Rallies, and this means that I have in most instances met with them ahead of time in a Planning Conference. I also meet with the officers of the Conference in a kind of "Planning Retreat" each fall. The meetings of young people go on continually on the Conference Level! I regret that I am unable to visit more local young people's organizations, but I do drop in on as many as I can. Recently I reviewed the Home Missions Stury Book, Who, for young people's groups from Holy Neck, Bethlehem and Holland at the Holland Church; and at Windsor for the four churches of that parish. I do as much interdenominational work with young people as possible, but that is far too little. I have participated for the past two years in the leadership of Virginia State Youth Council, held in Richmond. This fall I attended a Planning Conference set up for youth leaders in North Carolina. We also try to have young people represented at the committee meetings of the State Interdenominational Council. I have agreed to teach this year in the Southeast Regional Youth Camp at St. John's River, August 8-15. I keep in constant touch with the work of the National Pilgrim Fellowship and try to keep our young people informed. We arranged to have two delegates attend the National Meeting in Pomona, California, in 1952. We have plans to have a young person from each of our five Conferences attend the National Meeting to be held at Yale Divinity School, June 23-30. I have also agreed to be one of the leaders there.

STUDENT WORK. I have been unable to do very much work with our students in Virginia, other than keeping in personal touch with students I know from our churches who are attending Virginia colleges and universities or are in school at Elon. A very wonderful Student Conference was held at the Presbyterian Camp New Hope last spring with a large number of colleges represented. An afternoon and evening meeting was held at First Church, Greensboro, last fall which was pretty well attended. As this report is being written, we have plans for another Student Camp at Quaker Lake on April 24 and 25. During this biennium there has been a thriving student group organized at Duke. We have been in touch with students from other colleges which do not have Congregational Christian Student Ogranizations. My plans now are to visit each student group early next fall—as early as I can arrange it.

SUMMER STUDENT SERVICE WORK. This takes considerable time because we have to carefully select the students who are going to work with us, provide them with some kind of training and literature, and then make their schedules in churches across the Convention. A student worker will be available to any of our churches this summer which feels that it does not have sufficient help for conducting its own

Vacation Bible School. Entertainment is the only requirement except in places in which the church feels that while it lacks leadership, it is able to make an offering toward the Board of Christian Education which promotes this work.

SUMMER CAMPS AND CONFERENCES manage to take a great deal of my time. Each year we must go through the process of finding a suitable place for the camps, and if we have a suitable place, to fit into the dates of other groups using these camps. It will be wonderful when we have our own camp at Moonelon and can set up our Conferences at the most convenient time for our Southern Convention work. Six camps and conferences were held last summer, with larger attendance in the aggregate than ever before. It is easy to imagine the amount of correspondence that goes on in the selection of places, dates, deans, faculty, materials for teaching, pre-session training conferences, promoting attendance from all of the churches, and in some cases, arranging for food. I have often said that any summer camp has at least one hundred details that have to be checked before it opens. At the Crabtree camps we must take mattress covers and lanterns and recreational equipment, worship equipment, projectors, books, and song books, and other things too numerous to mention. Each year we have special missionary guests, and they mean a lot to the young people. It seems now that one of the Summer Student Workers last year will go to Ceylon as a missionary because of the personal friendship with Grace Raju, who attended our camps last summer. This is the kind of result which thrills us. We had a National Youth Caravan-Congregational Christian-Evangelical and Reformed-assist us in the Valley Camp in 1952, and another at Elon in 1953. We also had Miss Rae Cochrane, from Montana, as a Pilgrim Fellowship visitor at some of our Conferences in 1953. All of these outside contacts are important for our young people. This is a two-way process, too. We have assisted young people from our area in working as part of National Youth Caravans. Last summer Becky Mann, from Eastern Virginia, and Page Painter, from the Valley of Virginia, were on National Youth Caravans in other parts of the country. Laverne Brady, Senior at Elon College and daughter of Rev. Carl Brady, was a Caravan Worker one summer, and last summer was in a work camp overseas. I should add that one of our churches experminted with a Church—Day Camp last summer most successfully, and we wish that other churches would attempt this to supplement the Conference and Convention Summer Camps and Conferences.

LEADERSHIP TRAINING. I wish we could report a better record of Leadership Training. We ought to have something of this kind for every church in the Convention. From time to time some types of training are available in each area, but not enough. For the past two years Leadership Training Schools were held in Greensboro for the entire Greensboro area of churches; in the Suffolk, Norfolk and Waverly Districts in the Eastern Virginia Conference last year, and this year Missionary Education Institutes with Miss Ione Catton as leader. During the biennium Leadership Training Schools have been held in Burlington for the Alamance County Churches; Pleasant Ridge for the churches of the Western North Carolina Conference; Virgilina for the three churches of that parish: and in Albemarle and Wake Chapel. I taught in an Interdenominational Training School in Winchester, Virginia, and in Elkton. Virginia has a great many more Interdenominational Leadership Training Schools than North Carolina, and I wish that there could be more of them in both states. In addition to Leadership Training Schools, there have been a Religious Education Institute for the churches of the Valley at Bethlehem Church, Pilgrim Series previews for the Burlington and Greensboro areas and in a few local churches. At the institutes in Waverly, Suffolk and Norfolk in March, I had the Sunday School materials on exhibit in the afternoons and held interviews with all who were interested. The Pilgrim Series materials are always on display in our office, both the past quarter and the current quarter. We need suggestions for more and better Leadership Training in the Convention.

VISUAL AIDS. We feel that there is a growing interest in the use of Visual Aids in our churches, and more churches are purchasing equipment. We do not have a sound projector in the Southern Convention Office, but we do have three filmstrip projectors. Our list of Visual Aids has just been revised and brought up to date and mimeographed and is now ready for distribution. Each year a large number of our churches use the feature film provided free from the Missions Council. "The Hidden Heart" was shown in a majority of our churches during the past year. Some of this

must be credited to the Women for their special promotion this year. The feature film for the coming year is called, "In the Beginning," and it will be ready for distribution toward the end of August. There are always good missionary filmstrips on hand in our office which we wish the churches would use. We also have on hand the current picture to accompany the Pilgrim Series Sunday School materials each quarter, and they are for free distribution. We should call attention especially to the Leadership Education Kit of filmstrips which are especially usable for teacher's meetings, Worker's Councils, and Leadership Training Schools. Our newest purchase is the seven filmstrpis of the nationally and interdenominationally produced Youth Kit. We hope that this will have wide use. Miss Doris Boswell, in our office, has to the product of the p

MISSIONS AND MISSIONARY EDUCATION. I attend most of the meetings of the Southern Convention Mission Board; write letters from time to time about projects to the churches, the use of Visual Aids for the promotion of Missionary Education; letters about the Thank Offering each year; materials about Sunday School projects, and send news of missionaries and most recently a Prayer List to The Christian Sun. I planned a series of Institutes at two different times during the past year for Miss Ione Catton, Missionary Education Program Secretary of the Missions Council. While she was here, the Mission Board set up a Convention-wide meeting of the Missionary Education Committee for her. The young people completed their project of bringing Jose Dabuet from the Philippines to study for a year in this country. Their current mission project is Moonelon, and I think there is increasing interest in that.

SPEAKERS. I have brought to our area, or worked with organizations to bring to our area during the biennum, the following people: Nick Piedisacalzi, National Pilgrim Fellowship President; Rae Cochrane, Pilgrim Fellowship visitor from Montana; a Youth Caravan of four young people to the Valley Conference, and another caravan of four young people to Elon; Leila Anderson for Leadership Training Schools; Dr. Paul Reynolds, Secretary of Family Life and Young Adult Work; Miss Marie Crosby of Angola, West Africa; Dr. and Mrs. William Q. McKnight of Japan; Miss Alice Huggins of China; Miss Hilda Theim of the Micronesian Islands; Miss Grace Raju, and a Japanese student to Summer Conferences; Miss Margaret Hargrove, Mrs. David McKeith and Rev. Quentin Leisher for Women's Meetings. Miss Jennie Doidge will attend the Fall Conferences of the Women; Mr. Max Martin Eichrodt from Switzerland, and Miss Ariam Parmansamy from Ceylon, will be special visitors of our Youth Conferences this summer. We hope to have Dr. and Mrs. Ed Riggs of India at Elon College School of Missions. We will have Miss Frances Eastman, Editor of the Program Manual and of Children's Religion, for Leadership Training in the area for two weeks, beginning June 3, 1955.

Women's Work. During the biennium I have attended most of the Board Meetings of the Southern Convention Women; the Eastern Virginia Women's Conference; all of them in North Carolina, and one Women's Board Meeting in the Valley Conference; the biennial meeting of the Southern Convention Women; all three Fall Conferences of the State Women's Conferences; most of the rallies for the two years in the three Womens Conferences; two meetings of District Chairmen in North Carolina, and the Local Presidents in the Durham-Raleigh, Henderson, Greensboro and Burlington areas. I have also worked with the School of Missions Committees and have attended both sessions. I have organized four new Women's Societies. I attended the National Women's Meeting in Cleveland for as many sessions as possible for the past two years, and this year led one of the discussions at their meeting.

My biggest job in Women's Work comes as Chairman of Literature. This means receiving and reading and helping to select the Mission Study books and Bible Study books for our Packet; also the other literature which comes from our National Offices; and, in addition, deciding upon extra programs to be prepared and holding meetings of our Literature Committee. The Packet is prepared with all the materials included, a sticker on the outside, and suggestions for using the materials. We have these packets and books on missions, worship, and other related themes at the School of Missions and the Fall Conferences; and answer hundreds of letters about literature each year. This continues throughout the year. I am in constant touch with Arm-

strong Hunter, who is Resource Leader for Missionary Materials. The bookkeeping in our office requires a lot of time because we handle all the money for the Summer Camps and Conferences, Summer Student Service Work, literature for the Women, and a lot of other things. We mimeograph materials for the young people's rallies and for a great many other meetings. In addition to all of the work which Doris Boswell does for me, she handles Visual Aids; keeps all of our mailing lists of Women, Sanday School Superintendents, etc., in the office up to date, and answers the telephone for us all. The latter is no simple job. During the year I met the Home Mission Study Tour of the Board of Home Missions in Durham and drove them by Chapel Hill, and on to Elon College for meetings there.

There have been a number of out-of-area meetings which I have attended since the last meeting of the Southern Convention: the General Council in California (arranging for a bus which took most of our delegates), the Mid-Winter Meeting in Cleveland for the two years, the Southeast Regional Meeting in Avon Park, a meeting at Bricks which is in the Southeast Convention, and a committee meeting with Dr. Scott at the old Midway Church, near Savannah, Georgia, for the General Council. I send in items from time to time for *The Christian Sun;* do whatever I can to have students from Elon College in our churches, taking some of them with me to meetings, and this year, bringing some young people for High School Day. I bring coupons and other packages to the Orphanage and tell others where to send these and Friendly Service materials.

All of these things listed above I enjoy doing. There just isn't enough time to do a good job. I wish each of our five Conferences could have a Director of Religious Education and Women's Work.

REPORT OF THE MISSION BOARD

Out of the heart of the Gospel comes the work of missions. The worship, the preaching, the teaching, the fellowship and the outreach of every church should sharpen its members' understanding of the trusteeship which God has placed in our hands. We are stewards of the gospel itself.

The current interpretation of stewardship implies a conserving of funds, a careful handling of resources. But in an earlier and simpler day, to be a steward meant to attend to the wants of others. Concern for the welfare of others is a Christian concept; missions it the fullest expression of that concern; our missionaries and workers are the finest examples of the true meaning of stewardship.

What is our aim of Missions? David Paton suggests, it is not primarily to save souls, but to provide the permanent means by which souls may be saved. To the helplessly ill, Missions sends doctors and says, "In His name, be healed"; to the weary, hungry toiler in primitive communities, Missions sends agricultural experts and says, "Eat, that you may have strength"; to the ignorant and frightened, Missions sends ministers and teachers, and says, "The truth shall make you free."

My friends, in our interpretation and promotion as well as in our administration and giving, we are to be stewards, knowing that we have the precious treasure of the Gospel in earthen vessels, but that it is indeed the supreme treasure. In this matter of the Mission of our church, may there be a personal response to a personal encounter with God.

A LOOK AT THE MISSION OF OUR CHURCH ABROAD

Africa.—Dr. Mary Cushman, at the age of 86, has just returned to the United States. Dr. and Mrs. Robert McGowan, the first medical missionaries in 25 years, have gone to this field. There is big news in the opening of secondary schools in Angola and Rhodesia. There is increased emphasis on evangelism. In South Africa the new gold fields, also rich in uranium, which are attracting so many Africans from all parts of the country, present one of the most serious challenges to Christianity. Ordained missionaries, for both rural and urban stations, are urgently needed. In an atmosphere of general despair and gloom, the church of South Africa stands out like a beacon light.

Mexico.—The major event of 1953 was the cornerstone laying of the new church at Guadalajava, the construction of which is proceeding at a rapid pace. The development of future leaders among present young people's groups is promising. They are planning for a deputation of young people to attend the national Pilgrim Fellowship meeting to be held in conjunction with the General Council at New Haven.

There is still a tremendous amount of work to be done, but the corner has been turned and the future is very hopeful.

China.—Word from China is scarce, especially so since there are no longer any American Board missionaries there.

As never before, our prayers are needed by our Chinese friends, whose stewardship is shown in an unshakable witness to the faith that is theirs. In 1951, Dr. Harold Matthews wrote, "The Church will be there somewhere, when the present storm has subsided."

Japan.—The United Church, the Kyodan, with its membership of 165,000, and which includes about 70 per cent of all Japanese Protestants, is doing a good work. The purpose of the first all-Japan conference of the Kyodan held in September was to consider the Mission of the church. There were more laymen than ministers and missionaries present, which was of great significance. Its leaders are mapping out a more effective evangelistic strategy for a country-wide campaign to lead up to the celebration in 1959 of the one hundredth anniversary of the coming of the first Protestant missionaries to Japan.

Christian Education is of greater importance to Japan today than ever before. Every dollar given for the new International Christian University is an investment in the most significant single event in the educational future in Japan in recent years.

In addition to communism, there is a renaissance of Buddhism and a return to Shintoism, with an accompanying upsurge of Nationalism. These are disturbing forces in Japan today. May we Congregational Christians of the United States not slacken our efforts, lest doors which are still open to Christianity close with a resultant loss to the people of the whole world.

The Philippines.—In its seventh year as an independent republic the Philippines shows marks of increasing maturity. Parallel to the growth and stabilization of government has gone the development of the United Church in the Philippines. Although, as in all fields, there is still a marked lack of adequately trained leaders.

Micronesia.—The church is the most important building on an island or in the village, being the center of both the spiritual as well as the social life of the people. The United States Navy, in whose hands is the security of the islands, has at last granted permission to two German missionaries to enter Trust Territory.

The Island people of Micronesia face into a new century of Christian develop-

ment with renewed determination and consecration,

India and Ceylon.—In our three missions in India and Ceylon there are about 70 ordained Indian ministers in charge of 5700 Christians.

It has been pointed out that there are two movements in India today. One is communism with 5 per cent of the people, and the other is Christianity with 2 per cent of the people. These movements differ as to the ultimate goal for man, and also as to the means of reaching the goal. In each it is the spirit, not the present size that is important. We must strengthen the spirit of the Christians.

The Near East.—In Greece and Turkey the American Board alone represents the Christian West, and in Syria and Lebanon we share work only with the Presbyterian Board. In these lands the Christian West is measured by our stewardship.

Our work in the Near East has followed three phases:

1. Friendly service among the ancient churches. 2. Cooperation with a young and eager Protestant church. 3. Since World War I, the direct, friendly approach to the Moslem.

Europe.—In Europe where the churches seek for the needs of this day new forms of creative witness, our mission of fellowship center, under the leadership of Howard and Elsie Schomer, plays its important role. At the center many Christian bodies are brought together. May this serve as a radiant beacon of Christian life and human solidarity and comprehension.

CONVENTION HOME MISSIONS

The Board is happy to report the organization of three new churches within the Convention during the biennium—Hendersonville, North Carolina; Burlington, "Lakeview"; South Boston, Virginia. Prospects are bright for the growth of these churches. We are glad to report that prospects are good for the organization of

new churches in the Norfolk, Newport News, and Harrisonburg, Virginia, areas. Our churches and pastors in these areas are promoting these projects in cooperation with the Mission Board and our denominational Board of Home Missions.

We are gratified with the progress of our newly organized churches: Fayetteville and Lakeview churches, where their first buildings were completed in 1953; Burlington "Beverly Hills," where the Sunday School membership is nearly 200 and the church membership is approaching 125, and where construction on the church sanctuary was begun with ground-breaking ceremonies on Sunday, April 11, 1954; Burlington "Zion," where the Sunday School and church membership have grown substantially, and where the building has been greatly improved; Hendersonville, where the Community Church became the First Congregational Church affiliated with the North Carolina and Virginia Conference in 1953.

We congratulate Greensboro, "Palm Street," on the retirement of their new building indebtedness ahead of schedule; Norfolk, "Bay View," where a lovely Christian Education building was erected in 1953; Southern Pines, where a modern Christian Education building has been completed and the sanctuary beautified. Each of these churches was aided by the Board. Winston-Salem, previously aided by the Board, has come to self-support through the devoted loyalty of a faithful pastor and people.

The books of the Mission Board show for the biennium Home Mission aid has been paid to the following churches, in some instances with the financial support of our denominational Board of Home Missions:

Salary Aid, \$28,389.39.—Bay View, Norfolk; Belew Creek and Salem Chapel; Bailey's Grove; Beverly Hills, Burlington; Carroll County Missionary; Chapel Hill; Elon College Community Church; High Point; New Lebanon; Mt. Bethel; Kallam Grove; Lakeview, Burlington; Timber Ridge and Virginia Valley Pastor-at-Large; Siler City; Big Oak; Virginia Valley Conference; Mebane; Zion, Burlington; Winston-Salem; Fayetteville; Ashville; Elm Avenue, Portsmouth.

Building Aid, \$34,045.12.—Beverly Hills, Burlington; Carroll County Mission; Winston-Salem; Bay View, Norfolk; Lakeview, Burlington; Greensboro, First; Palm Street, Greensboro; Southern Pines; Fayetteville; Lee's Chapel; Liberty; Central, Norfolk (formerly Second); Hopedale; Zion, Burlington.

Special Aid, \$9,208.44.—Franklinton Center; Beverly Hills, Burlington; Lakeview, Burlington; Fayetteville; Carroll County Mission; Elon College and Chapel Hill Churches (Student Ministry); Zion, Burlington; Hendersonville; etc.

NATIONAL HOME MISSIONS, MINISTERAL RELIEF AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

During the biennium the Board has forwarded to the Board of Home Missions, New York, a total of \$21,620.96, of which \$16,904.32 was for Ministerial Relief and the regular work of the Board of Home Missions, and \$4,716.64 for the Christmas Fund.

To the American Board, Relief and Reconstruction, and the Congregational Christian Service Committee we forwarded the sum of \$50,421.60 for the biennium.

We paid to the Mission of our church outside the Southern Convention the sum of \$72,042.56 during the biennium.

We wish to acknowledge particularly the generous gifts from the Woman's Missionary Convention; from our Reidsville Church in support of two foreign missionaries; from our First Church, Greensboro, for the continued support from the Cora Anthony Fund; and from Gibsonville, Shallow Ford, Rosemont, and other churches and individuals who gave "over and above" the apportionment for special foreign mission projects.

The Board anticipates an increase in Mission giving during the coming biennium, that we may meet opportunities for new churches within the Convention, give more generous support to our National Home Mission Program, and to meet urgent demands of the American Board for carrying the gospel to other lands.

THE CHURCH BUILDING LOAN FUND CAMPAIGN

We rejoice in the progress to date on the Congregational Christian Church Building Loan Fund Campaign, and it is our earnest hope that the churches of the Southern Convention will raise their full quota. To date, approximately \$95,000 has been received in Declarations of Purpose. Our Church Building Society has been very generous with our churches in the Convention in loans and grants. More than \$400,000 in aid has been received by our churches—\$200,000 within the past five years. We recommend that our churches support the CBLF and that our Convention quota of \$135,000 be fully subscribed. To that end we request that the Mission Board be permitted to continue to contact the churches not yet having made their Declaration of Purpose. We acknowledge the generous service of the Convention and Conference Committees. Let us help them succeed.

MINISTERIAL RELIEF

Effective with the 1952-54 biennium, the responsibility of the former Board of Superannuation has fallen to the Mission Board. We have endeavored to discharge that important responsibility, and have sought to serve our retired and disabled ministers and widows of ministers. The Board has among its members a Standing Committee on Ministerial Relief.

Receipts and Disbursements to the Division of Ministerial Relief of the Board of Home Missions, New York, for the biennium—January 1, 1952, to December 31, 1953, was \$14,298.51—\$9,581.87 for the general work of the Division, and \$4,716.64 for the Christmas Fund.

Grants.—Approximately \$18,500 was paid during the biennium by the Division of Ministerial Relief of the Board of Home Missions as regular pensions, emergency grants and Christmas Fund gifts to our Convention retired and disabled ministers, and to widows of ministers, as follows:

Let us not fail to support our aged servants of the Cross. A share of your church's apportionment gifts for National Home Missions goes to the Division of Ministerial Relief of our Board of Home Missions, and at Christmas time our Christmas Fund gifts make it possible for an extra "love gift" to those dear ones of the church.

We are grateful for the helpful and sympathetic services of Dr. Frank J. Scribner and Rev. Samuel Keck of the Division of Ministerial Relief.

We are gratified that the Southern Convention Group Insurance Plan effected in 1952 has been so successful. We urge our churches and pastors to continue their support of this helpful service our Convention and Conferences are sponsoring on behalf of our pastors, our full-time lay employees, and their dependents.

We urge our ministers to become members of the Annuity Fund of our denomination. It will be to their disadvantage not to be members of the Annuity Fund. We urge our churches to pay their full share of the annual dues to the Annuity account of their pastor.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

During the past two years your Board of Christian Education has found an increasing task. For this we are greatful, yet time has not permitted the accomplishments of all of our hopes.

State-wide Pilgrim Fellowship meetings have been held and this year we are planning a Convention-wide Pilgrim Fellowship meeting on April 24 and 25 at Burlington, North Carolina. The several Conference Pilgrim Fellowships have regular meetings, some quarterly and some twice a year.

Emphasis has been on Leadership Training. Local and area Leadership Training Schools have been held throughout the Convention. A definite attempt has been made to train our Sunday Schools to see and use the Pilgrim Series lesson material, for we believe this is the best available anywhere. Superintendents of Sunday Schools have met; this year we have attempted to include all of those interested in Christian Education in these Superintendents' meetings. We recommend a Committee on Christian Education in each local church.

Students in colleges and universities are claiming our attention. A North Carolina Congregational Christian Student Conference is now planned for April 24 and 25 at Quaker Lake in North Carolina. We desperately need a person to visit and advise with our Congregational Christian students in all of our colleges and universities. Elon College is our own college and many of our young people are there.

It is recommended that each church hold a Student Recognition Service the Sunday after Christmas, when most students are home.

We urge your support of Elon College. It is necessary that we build new dormitories and a new dining hall. To have a college like Elon in our midst is to keep before us the need of Christian Education of our young people. No college can do this better than a Church-related College like Elon College.

Summer camps and conferences for our youth are increasing. This year we plan to hold seven such camps. We look forward to the day when Moonelon will be available for such meetings. Then we can schedule events to fit the needs; now, we just take what is given to us as far as time goes. If this Convention votes to place the responsibility of Moonelon on this Board, we hope each church will pay the apportionment on Christian Education, part of which will care for Moonelon's current expenses.

Film strips and films are provided the churches to develop the work of Christian Education. A Leadership Training Kit has been most useful; a new kit on Youth work is now available. Order these and others through Pattie Lee Coghill's office at Elon College.

The charter for the Board is being revised and will be presented to the Convention or its Executive Board for approval before being sent to the State of North Carolina.

REPORT OF BOARD OF PUBLICATIONS

The chief responsibility of the Board of Publications would be conceded by those best informed to be "the publishing of *The Christian Sun*," because the fact is that every other interest of the Southern Convention would be jeopardized if for any reason the publishing of *The Christian Sun* should be discontinued.

From the earliest recollection of us all, we have heard about the precarious status of *The Christian Sun*—its financial problems and the uncertainty of its future—as if *The Christian Sun* was a liability instead of an asset. But the fact has been and is now that because of the heavy burden of service which *The Christian Sun* has always carried in behalf of every department of the Southern Convention, *The Christian Sun* has always been and is the greatest asset of our church in the South. Indeed, the life and perpetuity of the Southern Convention depend upon *The Christian Sun*. And because of that fact, it is the responsibility of the churches of the Southern Convention and of the Southern Convention per se to provide for the continuance of *The Christian Sun*.

First, your Board of Publications would recommend that the Southern Convention as such, and each of its individual departments, go the very limit in the ensuing biennium in subsidizing the publication of *The Christian Sun*, and

Second, for a Convention-wide campaign in which every pastor whose church has not accepted plan "A" or "B" presented by Supt. Scott, would at least put on an intensive campaign to double the *Sun's* subscription list in his parish.

During the past year, the Managing Editor, Mr. J. T. Kernodle, has also served as Editor without any compensation. Various pastors have been requested to serve in writing Guest Editorials gratis, and gladly responded. But the person responsible for doing the work of Editor should receive some remuneration for his services. If such compensation had been made the past year, whatever deficit now obtaining would be increased accordingly.

Supt. Wm. T. Scott conceived the desirability of inviting the pastors and the other leaders in the Convention to attend "A Hearing" on *The Christian Sun* to council with the Board of Publications on ways and means to promote the interests of our paper. Said Hearing was held at Henderson, North Carolina, on March 16.

It was plainly evident that few if any of the group attending the Hearing would favor any plan of sending the paper free into all the homes within the Southern Convention, the local churches voluntarily, or the Southern Convention through its apportionment schedule to underwhite the cost—the sentiment expressed being that what people receive free is usually considered to be of less importance than what they pay for. Indeed, free subscriptions to church papers have not proved to be practical in the experience of numerous churches and denominations that have adopted such a plan in promoting their periodicals. "You can lead a horse to water, but you can't make him drink"—and just so, "you can send *The Christian Sun* into all the homes of the Southern Convention, but you can't insure that it will be opened or read."

What is required is to quicken the interest of our people in *The Christian Sun*, so that they will want it and will subscribe to it.

We believe that the securing of an Editor of *The Christian Sun* would be a big factor in promoting the interests of the paper along the line.

We recommend that the Board of Publications be instructed to prepare an annual budget and necessary subsidies for publishing *The Christian Sun*, the same to be presented to the Executive Board for approval.

REPORT OF THE RURAL CHURCH COMMITTEE

The Rural Church Committee in cooperation with the Division of Church Extension and Evangelism of the Board of Home Missions of our Congregational Christian Churches conducted an institute for Rural Ministers on January 12-14, at

the Brick Rural Life School, Bricks, North Carolina. Parts of the institute were open to Ministers of the Convention of the South in attendance at a training session being conducted at the same time.

The attendance at and reaction to the institute indicate serious consideration should be given to making such an institute a regular project of the Rural Church Committee.

The Rural Church Committee submits the following recommendations:

- 1. That the Rural Pastor's School at V. P. I. and the Pastor's School at Deering, New Hampshire, be commended to our Rural Ministers.
- 2. That our Churches observe Rural Life Sunday.
- 3. That, where it is practicable, the "Lord's Acre" program be initiated.
- That our rural churches cooperate with social and state agencies working for the betterment of rural life.
- 5. That use be made of the "Parish Workbook" put out by the Town and Country Department of the Board of Home Missions.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON STEWARDSHIP

By reading over the reports of this Commission to the past several sessions of the Convention, one finds little left to merit recommending.

The time was when there were so many things we did not know about Christian Stewardship and its purposes and possibilities, resolutions were drawn in an effort to stimulate research and trial. No longer is that so. No longer de we need to recommend and resolve on the Convention and Conference level, but to take what we know and begin practicing it on the local church level under the enthusiastic leadership of the local pastor who can find abundant materials for any church situation, and can secure good outside help for the efficient conduct of Stewardship Institutes and Canvasses. The following figures will prove how true this conclusion is.

Though we cannot compare progress by similar answers in past years, every pastor in the Convention was asked to answer two questions on his church reports to Conference for 1953. Two questions were asked: 1. Does your church, or churches, have an annual budget? 2. Does your church, or churches, have an annual Every Member Canvass? Here are the results:

Valley of Virginia Conference.—Churches having budgets, 2; with no budget planned, 13; not answering, 5; Churches conducting annual Every-Member Canvass, 3; no canvass, 12; not answering, 5.

Eastern Virginia Conference.—Churches having budgets, 31; with no budgets, 9; not answering, 3; Churches conducting annual canvasses, 23; no canvass, 16; not

answering,4.

Eastern N. C. Conference.—Churches having budgets, 17; with no budgets, 11; not answering, 15; Churches conducting annual canvasses, 11; no canvass, 15; not answering, 17.

Western N. C. Conference.—Churches having budgets, 12; with no budgets, 14; not answering, 8; Churches conducting annual canvasses, 2; no canvass, 23; not answering, 9.

N. C. and Va. Conference.—Churches having budgets, 31; with no budgets, 15; not answering, 3; Churches conducting annual canvasses, 15; no canvass, 22; not answering, 12.

This analysis is most revealing. It clearly points out what our possibilities are. Whose fault is it that so little is being done in so many of our churches?

The Convention Office and your Commission have cooperated in holding Stewardship Institutes for pastors, and in otherwise promoting the cause of Christian Stewardship. According to reports in hand only one church that went all-out for a good institute and followed with a well-planned canvass, failed to reach its goal, and that shortage will be overcome through loose offerings. Such a program has been tried in every type of church, and it can be as successfull in an open country church as in a city church. All it needs is a trial, followed up by scund educational principles. Stewardship is not a financial spasm to meet emergencies. It is a way of life, for all men, and for all churches.

We most heartly commend the action of the Convention in employing a Secretary of Stewardship and Evangelism. If the pastors will back this individual up and use him in our churches, a great many of the above figures can be changed to more favorable ones, and the financial needs of our total program can and will be met, and new souls born into the Kingdom. We urge all pastors to begin now their plans for Stewardship Institutes and canvasses in their churches this fall.

REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY CONVENTION

In the Manual of our National Fellowship of Congregational Christian Women the purpose of an organization of church women is spoken of as "helping women to cultivate the spirit of Christ, beginning with their own lives and reaching out into heme and community and the uttermost parts of the earth." As a part of our national Fellowship, which includes 700,000 Congregational Christian women, our Woman's Missionary Convention has been seeking to do this through a program of worship, education, service and giving.

During the biennium of 1952-54 all railies and conferences were held. Each year a School of Missions, with a well-rounded program and excellent leaders, has been held at Elon College. Plans are now nearing completion for our Ninth Annual School of Missions which will be held at Elon College, July 13-16, 1954.

The Twenty-First Biennial Session of the Woman's Missionary Convention was held at the First Church, Burlington, on April 28, 29, 1953. The reports given there showed that splendid work had been accomplished in all departments.

The Treasurer's report for the biennium showed that our women had contributed \$34,079.65 to the church's program and missionary enterprises. (This was an increase over the previous biennium as the reports included money received for only seven quarters, as we changed our fisical year to coincide with the calendar year.)

Our Thank Offering was designated for the Japan International Christian University, and amounted to \$2,803.30. The 1952 Thank Offering for our Carroll County work amounted to \$4,355.75.

The Life Membership and Memorial Funds for the past and the present biennium are designated for Franklinton Center. Since Franklinton is being relocated at Bricks, the funds from our Life Memberships and Memorials will be used toward the restoration of the Chapel there in the new location.

It was voted at the Burlington Convention that the Staley Memorial Scholarship Fund of \$7100 (invested in government bonds) be turned over to Elon College for administration—these funds to become a part of the Elon College trust funds.

Friendly Service gifts have been sent to many places, both at home and abroad.

We have been represented at the meeting of the General Council (Claremont, California), the Mid-Winter Sessions of the Missions Council, and the National Assembly of United Church Women.

This report includes only a portion of our work. We rejoice in our task and continue our journey along the King's highway. There we find "that the paths of service extend into every area of human life, with the individual, with the family,

with our immediate neighbors, with those in physical and spiritual need whether they be near or far, and with human beings as individuals, groups and nations around the world in our common search for a creative and enriching fellowship with God."

The first one thousand dollars ever raised by the Laymen's Fellowship was recently sent to the Convention Treasurer for Moonelon. We hope this is the forerunner of many thousands of dollars our laymen's groups will raise for the work of the Southern Convention.

Practically all our churches observe Laymen's Sunday on the third Sunday in October.

Work packets were sent to all churches to help them with the laymen's work. These packets included suggestions for programs and organization of laymen's groups. This has been a great help for our laymen, as reports show that more laymen's groups have been formed in the local churches.

We have held our Mid-Winter Rally at Elon College each year of the past biennium. Each year we have planned an educational program for our men, and we have had a record attendance.

With few exceptions our Conferences have held their Laymen's Rallies and report good programs and good attendance

The laymen are planning to hold a "Work Day" at Moonelon on June 5. At that time we hope to have at least three hundred men in attendance. They will build roads and clear land, doing things to "dress up" the property for our young people this summer.

The following officers were elected at our Mid-Winter Rally held at Elon College on Sunday, February 14, 1954, and will serve for the next two years: Chairman, W. B. Williams; Vice-Chairman, J. Earl Danieley; Secretary-Treasurer, S. H. Pell.

We believe you will hear great things in the next two years from the laymen. We look forward to the increased interest of our laymen in the work of the local church, the Conferences, and the Southern Convention.

REPORT OF THE YOUTH FELLOWSHIP

The Southern Convention Youth Fellowship, while endeavoring to carry on a program which is in keeping with the purposes and plans of the National Council of Pilgrim Fellowship, has striven to strengthen itself by inviting into the organization the young people of all our churches, whether an organized group or not, and by giving spiritual and material assistance to those who wish to be a part of the organization.

Two delegates attended the Eighth National Council in 1952, held at Pomona College, Claremont, California. At this meeting the Three Commissions Plan was adopted (Faith, Action, and Fellowship). Curtis Young was elected National Chairman of the Faith Commission. The Three Commission Plan was incorporated in the plans of the Southern Convention Youth Fellowship at a meeting of the officers and advisors in the late summer of 1952.

In this biennium the Philippines project, begun in January of 1951, was concluded. The last bill for the expenses of Jose Dabuet's schooling here in the United States was paid. Mr. Dabuet returned home in August of 1952. The chief home mission project was Moonelon.

The Youth Fellowship has adopted a plan whereby a Convention-wide meeting will be held every two years and State Rallies the alternate years. In 1953 the Conferences held highly successful State Rallies with Nick Piediscalzi, National President of the Pilgrim Fellowship, as speaker. In April of 1954, the Convention-wide meeting was held in Burlington. The topics included the plans for the coming biennium, election of officers, and plans for representation at the National Council of Pilgrim Fellowship to be held later in the year.

It has been the work of the Youth Fellowship to carry on a program that challenges the highest development of Christian character, that calls forth young people to give their best to their Christ and to His Church.

Exhibit 13 REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE MINISTRY

Most good sermons have three points. Similarly, your Conference Committee on the Ministry looks upon its task in a three-fold manner.

- (1) First, there is the challenge to encourage the ministers now serving the churches to keep up their studies and research. Naturally, in the rush and pressure of duties and church activities, this is not easy. In response to numerous requests from men in the field, a study conference and retreat was planned at Camp New Hope last May. The ministers of the Convention spent two days together in study and discussion of some of the basic themes of Christian faith. Those who attended were so gratified with the conference that they voted to hold another this spring, May 10-12. It is hoped that all ministers of the Convention will plan to attend.
- (2) The second area of concern is pointed up in the reprint of an address made by Dr. Raymond Calkins, a veteran minister of the Congregational Christian Churches. In remarking about the ministry as a calling Dr. Calkins says, "He (the minister) has placed on him a well-nigh superhuman task. His salry is likely not to exceed the pay of skilled workmen or even that of unskilled laborers. It will barely enable him to live day by day in a manner suitable to his profession."

At two practical points the minister's task may be lightened by understanding lay people. (1) Relief from the pressure of details which may be shared with other persons. (2) Relief from personal financial strain. It is recommended, therefore, that a responsible committee in each local church conduct a through and prayerful study of the question, "What can be done specifically to release the minister from these pressures and allow him to devote his full energies to the work God has called him to do?"

(3) A third area concerns the recruiting and training of new ministerial leadership. Would that your Convention Committee might report that the supply of your ministers has been increased to the point where each unit of work is assured of well-trained and effective leadership and that new work may be opened with assurance that there is available leadership.

But alas, every person present knows that no such report could be made. It is doubtful if the group of young men now in training is sufficiently large to take care of normal retirement, to say nothing of expanding needs of our Convention. Some of these young ministerial candidates are being drafted into active service during their all-too-short days of preparation.

Your committee, therefore, urges that the local churches and ministers, denominational and educational officials, keep this matter on top of the desk at all times. More specifically, it is recommended that a student conference be set up for the express purpose of presenting the work of the ministry to young people of our churches.

REPORT ON MOONELON

Since the Durham meeting of the Convention, the property of Moonelon, consisting of twenty acres of land with numerous improvements, located one quarter mile from the center of Elon College, North Carolina, has meen administered by the Moonelon Committee of the Southern Convention, so authorized by the vote of the Convention.

Rev. and Mrs. J. L. Neese of Bradenton, Florida, served as custodians and supervised activities over the summer months of 1952 and 1953. Our sincere thanks go to this devoted couple who occupied the lodge and performed service beyond the call of duty in making many repairs and improvements with a very limited budget. The swimming pool was used by hundreds of persons who came as church, college, or orphanage groups. Some overnight retreats, work days and numerous picnics and outings have taken place. Through the fall and winter months various college organizations have used the lodge for parties and outings.

On March 14, 1954, a ground-breaking ceremony was held on the site of the proposed central building. Plans for the same have been drawn and several planning sessions have been held by various groups of the Laymen's Fellowship, which is sponsoring construction. Interest in this project is mounting at all levels of our laymen's work, local, conference and Convention-wide. A Convention Laymen's Work Day has been set for June 5, 1954, with the hope that a large group of men will assemble for actual construction purposes.

The proposed building calls for slag-block, concrete floor, and wooden trusses, with asphalt shingle roofing. The over-all dimensions are 40 by 60 feet, with a spacious front porch. It is thought that about \$15,000, plus some donated materials and labor, will complete this structure and give the Convention a building worth at least \$20,000.

Following the completion of the main building, it is hoped that cabin faicilities for 100 young people may be constructed at once so that our Youth Conferences may be held at Moonelon over the summer months of 1955.

The Moonelon Committee recommends that the Convention place this entire holding under the care and supervision of the Board of Christian Education. The Convention will continue to hold the title to the property, with the Board assuming the responsibility of administration and program.

In order to have money available for the overhead expense of Moonelon, the Committee has recommended to the Board of Christian Education that it request the Convention through the Finance Committee to add \$1,000 to the Christian Education apportionment.

Your Committee has produced several pieces of promotional printed matter during the biennium and has appeared before numerous groups on behalf of our Conference Center's development. It is our judgment that if the people of the churches will grant adequate support to our building program over the next few months, equipment will be added to our holdings that will pay tremendous dividends to the life of our churches and represent the most significant material development that has come to the Convention in many years.

REPORT OF ELON COLLEGE

Religion and education compliment each other. Religion without education could become superstitions and fanatical. Education without religion could become pagan and progressively destructive. The Christian Church was born in a wave of evangelism under the preaching of the apostle Peter. The church was stabilized and indoctrinated under the sanity and rationalization of the apostle Paul.

The Christian Church, our denomination, at its beginning was warmly evangelistic. In 1889, a definite program of education was adopted. Elon College was founded and the church began to instruct and train its own leaders. Beginning with an idea and a plan, the College has developed into an effective institution of Christian

higher education, so that today, we are able to present a College with adequate instructional facilities and a full curriculum of studies in the field of higher education. At Elon College, we are training by far the greater number of our pastors and a good percentage of the leaders of our local churches, conferences and Convention.

The following are pertinent facts relative to the College in which members of the Convention, the church at large and the general public should be greatly interested.

- 1. Physical Plant. There has been no particular change in the physical plant during the past two years. We are encouraged to know, however, that facilities for instruction are excellent and sufficient for a small liberal arts college, with a possible exception of library facilities, which must be enlarged as early as possible. Living conditions on the campus for boarding students are below par. The one great responsibility facing the Trustees, the church, the alumni, and all who are interested in Elon College is to provide suitable dormitories and a dining room for the convenience and comfort of our students on the campus.
- 2. Faculty. Elon College has an excellent faculty; 42 men and women who are specialists in their respective fields. They are admirably fitted for their work as instructors in higher education from the standpoint of training and experience. There are some replacements that must be made. These changes will be effected during the summer, and an improved faculty will be ready for responsibilities at the opening of the College in September.
- 3. Student Enrollment. The Board of Trustees of Elon College is on record not to permit enrollment in the College to exceed 1,000. During the peak of enrollment following World War II, Elon's enrollment exceeded 900 for the regular session. Enrollment for the current year is interesting. At the beginning of the Winter Quarter, the College enrolled one more student than it lost by graduation, failures and dropouts. This had never occurred before. At the beginning of the Spring Quarter, we gained 21 more than we lost; another record broken. For the Spring Quarter, we have 707 students on the campus. The total enrollment for the year amounts to 771. Prospects for the summer enrollment and the regular college year, beginning in September, are indeed promising, all of which is encouraging. The discouraging factor about it is the failure of many of our own church people to patronize their own College. It isn't because we do not have a good school or good facilities. Others patronize the College and succeed. This year Elon College has one graduate in the University of South Carolina on a scholarship of \$1,350 a year. A member of our Senior Class has been awarded a scholarship of \$1,350 to Duke University, and another member of our Senior Class has been awarded the Morehead Scholarship at the University of North Carolina which amounts to \$1,500 a year. These honors are awarded on the basis of personality, scholarship and citizenship. Unfortunately, not one of these students is a member of our church.
- 4. Endowment. Since 1942, \$300,000 has been added to the College's endowment, making a total of approximately \$530,000. This is a very small endowment for a college of the size, achievements, standing and influence of Elon College. We must, as quickly as possible, increase our endowment to \$1,000,000. The income from endowment fluctuates between \$22,000 and \$25,000 annually. The College also has \$375,000 in invested funds from which it receives between \$27,000 and \$28,000 annually. Invested funds represent faculty houses and veteran's apartments. A limited amount is invested in stocks and bonds. The principal of this money may be used for current expenses or as collateral for loans necessary for improvements and current operations. The principal of endowment funds must be held clear of all incumbrances or obligations of any kind. These funds are trust funds and must be held inviolate.

5. Finances.

A. Capital Funds: The total financial value of Elon College, including buildings, grounds, farm lands, stocks, bonds, endowment, invested funds, is \$2,813,588.76. Fortunately, there is no indebtedness against the College with the exception of the recent obligations to the Town of Elon College for the construction of a sewer system. This indebtedness is \$15,800.

- B. Current Funds: The current fund budget of Elon College is \$410,000. The budget is met as follows:
- (1) Student tuition and fees, which amount to approximately seventy-five percent of the budget.
- (2) Conference apportionment of \$15,000, and the Sustaining Fund of \$1 per member (approximately \$35,000). From these two sources, through the Convention Office, the College received during 1953 a total of \$23,915.24. In 1952 the College received a total of \$23,851.47, making a grand total of \$47,755.71 for the biennium.
- (3) Endowment and invested funds. From this source the College receives approximately \$50,000 annually.
- (4) Contributions outside of the Southern Convention, churches, the Division of Christian Education, and the Palmer Fund, which amount to approximately \$3,000 a year.
- 6. Needs. I presume that Elon College has never faced a day or ever will face a day when it is not conscious of its needs, many of which could be met by money. We dislike the word "money" except when it is coming our way. Fortunately, for us as individuals and the church as a whole, we must give financial support to Elon College. At present, we need to add a minimum of \$500,000 to Elon College's endowment fund. We need \$1,000,000 for the erection of four dormitories and a dining room. We need a swimming pool attached to the gymnasium, and a stadium for athletic and other events. These added equipments would cost us approximately \$200.000.
- 7. Plans. In 1946, plans began to take shape to provide funds for the future Elon College. At that time, a campaign was launched to secure \$1,000,000. In 1948 the fund to be raised was increased to \$2,000,000. In 1952 the figure was increased to \$2,500,000. These amounts and campaigns were authorized by this Convention on corresponding dates. To date, \$1,337,667.32 has been secured in cash and pledges. (Cash, \$1,201,417.32; pledges, \$136,250.00, approximately.) This campaign is to be completed by 1956. There will be unpaid pledges certainly at that date, but the plan calls for the campaign itself to be completed by December 31, 1955, during which time, according to plans, we shall secure this full amount in cash and pledges.
- 8. Cooperation. The plan adopted presents a tremendous undertaking on the part of Elon College's constituency. It does challenge our resources, our loyalty, our generosity and our faith. The above plan, however, is no more challenging than the cause that it represents and the needs of Elon College, our College.

The need for dormitories and a dining room on Elon's campus is imperative and immediate. The Board of Trustees of the College recognized this need, and has voted on two occasions authorizing the College administration to make application to the United States Government for a loan of \$650,000. The application has been made, approved in principle, and the money set aside for Elon College, pending completion of the application. Conditions as I understand them at this stage of the negotiations are:

The loan to bear $3\frac{1}{2}$ percent interest per annum, two years payable in advance, to be amortized over a period of forty years, if desired. The loan may be paid at any time without penalty.

Surety required: The College will be required to incumber the buildings for which the government lends the money, including the ground on which the buildings

stand, and an easement from the highway to and from the buildings.

In addition, the College will be required to pay two years' interest in advance; amount \$45,500. This will be deducted from the \$650,000, leaving \$604,500, which will be paid to the College in lump sum. The College will be asked to give assurance that the regular payments will be made for the first six years. At the end of the six year period, the College will be required to have accumulated two years annual payment, principal and interest, which will be approximately \$65,000. Either that or the College may give additional security to the government to guarantee the two years' payment. Whatever assets the College may give for this security will be left in the hands of the College, and the College will collect and receive the income therefrom.

Some thirty or more of our pastors of the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches met in Henderson, North Carolina, and voted favoring a plan to ask the churches in North Carolina to raise \$150,000 over a period of three years for Carolina Hall, a dormitory for boys; and the churches in Virginia to raise \$150,000 over a period of three years for Virginia Hall, a dormitory for girls. This money and all money received on the Two and One Half Million Dollar Campaign fund would go to retire this loan. In other words, this is our first and only obligation until this loan is paid in full.

Suggested Action

- 1. Approve the completion of the Two and One Half Million Dollar Campaign fund for the College by December 31, 1955, and authorize the Convention to cooperate with the administration of the College in forming an organization for the conduct of the campaign.
- 2. Approve the action of the Board of Trustees of Elon College in applying for the loan of \$650,000 from the government for the purpose of erecting two dormitories and a dining room on the Elon College campus and call upon our people to cooperate in plans to secure the necessary funds.
- 3. Approve Tuesday, September 21, as Founders' Day, at which time the campaign to complete the Two and One Half Million Dollar Fund for the College will be launched.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

In order that our churches may the better work on a regular benevolence budget system, your Finance Committee has endeavored to devise a plan for reducing the number of special appeals. To this end it has been necessary to increase the apportionment to a more realistic figure. You will note that the total Annual Apportionment recommended for Convention causes, National Home Missions and Foreign Missions is \$143,0000. Since the total contributed in the Conference Year 1952-53 was \$130,-013 for these causes, we believe the increase is not beyond our ability, if we will take seriously the principles of Christian Stewardship. You will note that the budget provides for the employment of the Stewardship and Evangelism Secretary, who we hope may be on the job before the fall of 1954. We urge the Conferences and churches to undertake joyfully the apportionments recommended.

We recommend the following Annual Apportionments and Budget for the 1954-56 Biennium—effective with the Conference Year 1954-55, and in order that the churches may be advised in advance of the Conference sessions of the increased apportionments, we recommend the Conference Executive Committees and Apportionment Committees take proper action thereon:

2. We recommend an Annual Operating Budget of \$29,500, effective January 1, 1955, for Convention Leadership, Promotion, Stewardship and Evangelism Secretary, and the Convention Office, to be administered by the Executive Board of the Convention.

Proposed Sources of Income:

Convention Fund \$25,000.00 Board of Christian Education 4,500.00

- 3. We recommend that the Board of Publications prepare an annual budget and subsidy schedule for publishing *The Christian Sun*, and present same to the Executive Board for approval.
- 4. It is recommended that boards and institutions pay the amounts specified for *The Christian Sun* and the Operating Budget of the Convention Office in monthly installments; and that appropriations from boards and institutions begin January 1, 1955, and run through the fiscal year ending December 31, 1956.
- 5. Elon College has made commendable progress and advancement. Our college has served our constituency well. The place of the denominational college and the church in higher Christian education has never been in greater need of support. Our support of Elon College needs to be greater, both in material and human resources. It will be noted that the Sustaining Fund was set up as an emergency measure four years ago. In lieu of the Sustaining Fund as a "special" for the approaching biennium, we recommend an increased apportionment for Elon College. We recommend an annual apportionment of \$35,000 for Elon College.

The Convention at its last session reaffirmed the special campaign for Elon College and approved increasing the campaign to \$2,500,000. We urge the constituency of the Convention to cooperate with the college authorities in the campaign to raise these necessary funds, that our college may be strengthened,

6. The Christian Orphanage. We recommend for the Christian Orphanage an annual apportionment of \$20,000; and that the Convention authorize the Orphanage to raise during the Orphanage Period an "Authorized Special" of \$25,000 annually from the Convention constituency for building rehabilitation and current budget purposes, such "Authorized Special" gifts from the Convention churches, organizations and individuals to be channeled through the Southern Convention Office and credited to the churches in a special column of The Annual. We recommend that this "Authorized Special" be a ceiling on special funds to be raised from the church constituency of the Convention for current operations.

We further recommend that the Convention authorize the Christian Orphanage to raise \$20,000 per year from non-Convention sources for building rehabilitation purposes.

7. The Mission Board. We recommend an annual apportionment of \$20,000 for Convention Home Missions and Church Extension; \$11,000 for National Home Missions and Ministerial Relief; and \$12,500 for Foreign Missions; these funds to

be supplemented by the generous gifts from the Woman's Missionary Convention as shown above.

We further recommend an annual "Authorized Special" for Foreign Missions of \$7,500, such "Authorized Special" to be channeled through the Convention Office and credited to the churches in THE ANNUAL.

In view of the fact that the quota for the Church Building Loan Fund Campaign of \$135,000 has not been subscribed, and since the churches of the Convention will need aid from our Congregational Christian Church Building Society if they are to expand their facilities as needed, and further, since it is a matter of self-respect that we pay our full quota to the CBLF, we recommend that the Mission Board be permitted to seek "Declarations of Purpose" from churches not having yet made declarations, and to complete the quota of \$135,000.

8. We recommend that all churches be urged to raise their Missions and Benevolent Funds through a budget, supported by the Every Member Canvass, for their entire Conference Apportionments. Churches which do not raise their entire apportionments by this budget should receive a special Offering for Missions at Easter, a special Thanksgiving Offering for the Orphanage, a special Christmas Offering for Ministerial Relief, and a special Offering for Elon College during the College Period. Until the regular contributions are sufficient to meet apportionments, churches should seek to raise the apportionments in full by seeking special gifts from individuals.

9. We recommend the continuance of the present plan of regular monthly offerings for Missions and the Orphangae, and the Fifth Sunday Offering for Elon College, to be taken by the Sunday Schools, until the amount of the apportionment for each shall have been raised in ful, thereafter all benevolent contributions from Sunday Schools should be allotted to the other items of apportionments which have not been raised in full. Contributions from Sunday Schools should be forwarded through the designated channels and credited on the respective Conference apportionments.

It is recommended that all contributions from churches, church organizations, and from individuals be credited either to apportionment or "Authorized Special" and so reported in *The Christian Sun* and The Annual. When the apportionment and/or "Authorized Special" is reached, that fact should be noted and observed, with no other appeals. Approved capital and permanent funds may be sought from individuals, but not through churches or church organizations, except as they may have special approval of the Convention or the Executive Board.

10. We recommend that the Orrhanage, the Mission Board and Elon College be authorized to make appeals for contributions, each during the period herein designated, as follows: Elon College—January, February, September and October; Missions—March, April, May and June; Orphanage—November and December; that Communion offerings may be received for Ministerial, Relief and that at Christmas a special offering may be taken for the "Christmas Fund for the Veterans of the Cross," said offering to be forwarded to the Division of Ministerial Relief of the Board of Home Missions, New York, as an emergency fund and extra appropriation to the superannuates. It is recommended that the practice of making appeals to churches, Sunday Schools and Auxiliaries for material or financial gifts at other times during the periods designated, be discontinued.

11. We recommend that the Board of Christian Education be authorized to appeal for offerings on Children's Day from Sunday Schools, and from individuals during July and August.

We recommend that all funds contributed by churches, church organizations, or by individuals of churches of the Convention be credited to their churches, be transmitted to the Convention Treasurer through the Convention Office; that the Convention Office report such gifts to the Secretary of the Conference in which the local church holds membership; and that each local church be furnished with quarterly reports of all funds sent from that local church for Convention enterprises, together with the balances due

12. During the past biennium several churches have followed the practice of sending contributions to the Convention Office with the request that they be distributed proportionally to all apportionment items. We commend these churches in this practice and recommend it to all the churches of the Convention for their favorable consideration.

- 13. The Finance Committee was requested to prepare a formula whereby Conference Apportionment Committees might work out the distribution to the churches of the various benevolence items adopted by the Convention as the part each respective Conference should have in raising Convention benevolences. Such a formula has been prepared, based upon the previous record of the local church for a three-year period, as to membership, amounts raised for Convention benevolences, and the amount spent on church expense. This formula is available upon request to the Convention Office.
- 14, The Southern Convention Office and the Treasurer of the Convention have submitted regular statements of the accounts to the Chairman and to the Executive Board. These financial records have been audited by Owen, Hogan and McMillan, C. P. A., Burlington, N. C. We recommend that the financial report of the Southern Convention Office and the Treasurer be approved as audited.

EXHIBIT 17 REPORT ON MINISTERIAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND

The Committee of two appointed by the Board of Christian Education, as authorized by the Convention, has met jointly with the Ministerial Loan Fund Committee as provided by vote of the Executive Board We have found that this joint Committee serves a useful purpose. Therefore, we recommend that item 4 of the Ministerial Loan Fund report be adopted by the Convention.

Grants of approximately \$100 annually are made to students needing aid and who are regularly enrolled in college or seminary. These are secured by negotiable notes, but which notes are cancelled with interest provided the beneficiary continues in the Congregational Christian ministry for at least a period of five years immediately following college or seminary graduation. The note and agreement provide that said student must continue in his educational preparation, or the note becomes due and payable with interest immediately.

We acknowledge with gratitude the action of the Eastern Virginia Conference in merging their Scholarship Fund with that of the Convention.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM AND DEVOTIONAL LIFE

By writing Guest Editorials on "Evangelism and the Devotional Life" for the columns of *The Christian Sun*, and by distributing among the pastors special Evangelism literature, as well as by personal correspondence on the part of the Chairman of this committee in answering inquiries from pastors relative to ways and means of promoting the work of Evangelism under various local situations, we have sought to keep "The Work of Evangelism" and "The Deepening of the Spiritual Life" before the churches throughout the past biennium. The chairman of the committee regretted having to decline an invitation from the National Council of Churches to be one of the Guest Speakers last March on the Preaching Mission at the Naval Air Base in Norfolk, and similarly having to decline an invitation from the Ministers Association of Everett, Pennsylvania, to hold a Union Preaching Mission in that city in January.

Perhaps there is nothing new to offer in the field of Evangelism, except a new and higher concern on the part of both the laity and the clergy. We have talked about Visitation Evangelism for the past twenty or thirty years as if it were a new technique in Evangelism, but the truth is that Visitation Evangelism has been practiced by the churches ever since Andrew introduced his brother Simon to Jesus. Visitation Evangelism is really not a new technique in Evangelism, but in the past two or three decades this old type of Evangelism has received a new emphasis and new expression.

Your Committee on Evangelism believes that the various techinques in Evangelism are of less importance than the Spirit of Evangelism—the passion to share the blessing of Christian faith and to enlist others in the fellowship of the church—for church members and pastors who possess the evangelistic urge and who are possessed by The Evangelistic Passion will find a way to give that urge expression just as naturally as the day follows the night.

Your Committee on Evangelism believes that the type of Evangelism that is the most workable in the respective communities and churches is the type that should receive the major emphasis. In some communities and in some churches the major emphasis will be upon mass Evangelism or the Revival Meeting. In other churches the major emphasis will be upon Educational Evangelism, which includes the Pastor's Class; Pastoral Evangelism; The Preaching Mission; Lay Evangelism; etc. But every layman and every pastor and every church is called of God to "Do the Work of an Evangelist." Evangelism is not an elective for any pastor or for any layman or for any church. Evangelism is "A Must." The Particular method used is not so important as is "the doing of the work."

Evangelism is the recruiting work of the Kingdom—the enlisting of new recruits in Kingdom Service. Every church member and every pastor, and every church has a definite responsibility in this important work of the Kingdom.

In reference to the various Boards mentioned in this report and nominations to them attention is invited to Article VIII, Section 4, of the Constitution of The Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, Incorporated, which states: "The Superintendent shall be a member ex officio, without vote, of all Convention Boards and Committees, and of Boards of Trustees of Elon College, the Christian Orphanage, and of the Boards of other Convention Institutions. . . .

The following recommendations are proposed for action:

- 1. It is recommended that the President of the Convention ordinarily serve for a single term of two years and that so far as is possible the office be rotated between members of the clergy and the laity.
- 2. It is recommended that the Executive Board undertake a study for future action of the question of whether a person should serve on more than one Board of the Convention and its Institutions, with the exception of the Executive Board.
- 3. It is recommended that the Board of Trustees of Elon College be empowered to fill such vacancies as might occur during the biennium from the list of nominees submitted by the Convention.
- 4. It is recommended that the Executive Committee of the Executive Board be empowered to elect the delegates to the General Council of Congregational Christian Churches.

CHRISTIAN ORPHANAGE REPORT

During the biennium the Orphanage cared for 117 children. Of them, 27 were released to private homes, 4 graduated at the high school and 3 of them went to work, 1 went into training to become a nurse, 1 died and 1 was married. At present we have 4 in the armed service of their country, and there were 80 at the Orphanage at the close of 1953.

Presented herewith are auditors' reports and farm reports for the two years. Both years of the biennium have been dry years. Last year we suffered a severe drought. Total cash from farm in 1952 was \$12,111.65, and in 1953 it was only \$7,659.09.

At the present time there is being completed the beautiful Holt Memorial Chapel. This is a gift of the family of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. Kirk Holt. The Chapel will be of inestimable spiritual value to every child and worker in the Orphanage family throughout the years to come.

At present there are 81 children at the Orphanage and they are well and happy. They are given a good home, good training and high ideals. Gratitude is expressed for all the consideration given by the Convention, churches and individuals and the aid given by outside organizations, business, individuals and agencies.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS

The Death Angel has invaded the ranks of the official family of our Convention during the past biennium and taken from us several of our ministers. Time and space will permit only an all-too-brief tribute to their character and service, far inacequate in proportion to what they were and the work they did.

DR. CHARLES EVERETTE NEWMAN

Charles Everette Newman was born on his father's farm in Isle of Wight County on May 30, 1874, and died at his home in Virgilina on October 9, 1952. He attended the public schools near his home until he was 14 years of age, when he had to leave school to help his father on the farm. He joined Oakland Christian Church at the age of 13 and his name was kept on the Church roll until his death.

In 1893 he entered the Preparatory Department of Elon College, passed from it into the College itself, and graduated in 1899. After a brief term as a teacher in a private school in South Norfolk (Berkley), he was first licensed and then ordained to the ministry. He did graduate work at Princeton Seminary in 1903 and 1904. After serving churches in the Eastern Virginia and the North Carolina and Virginia Conferences, he became pastor of a group of churches around Virgilina, including Union (Virgilina), Hebron and Liberty in Virginia, and Lebanon in North Carolina. He remained as pastor here for thirty years, until his retirement in 1946, and con-

tinued to live in Virgilina until his death in 1952. In recognition of his ability and service Elon College conferred upon him the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Divinity.

Dr. Newman was a quiet, modest, soft-spoken, thoughtful, scholarly man. He was a builder, not only of churches but of men. He loved people. He had a deep sense of loyalty to Christ and the church, and an inflexible devotion to duty. He was pure in heart, strong in faith, rich in wisdom, sturdy in character, spiritual in nature. He was in every sense a man of God, faithful and fruitful in all things, both as a preacher and as a pastor and as a priest of God in holy things. We honor him for what he was and what he did.

Dr. N. G. NEWMAN, Sr.

Nathaniel Gross Newman, Sr., brother of Charles Everette Newman, was also born on the home place in Isle of Wight County on February 13, 1868, and passed away in Raleigh, North Carolina, on January 17, 1954, at the age of eighty-six. He was educated in the Suffolk Collegiate Institute, Graham Normal School and Elon College, graduating from the latter institute with a Magna Cum Laude citation. He later took graduate work at the University of North Carolina, and at Chicago and Columbia Universities or Seminaries. After ordination in 1892, he began a ministry that was characterized not only by length, of years but by a high quality of service. In addition to serving churches in Eastern Virginia—he served as pastor of Holy Neck three times—he served as college pastor at both Defiance College in Ohio, and at Elon College in North Carolina. After his retirement in 1937 Dr. and Mrs. Newman returned to his farm near Everett's Bridge. After Mrs. Newman died in 1940 Dr. Newman continued to live at this home place except during the winter, which he usually spent with his daughter, Mrs. Carlyle Campbell, and family, in Raleigh. He was a regular attendant at Oakland and took an active interest and part in the affairs of the church. By dint of much research and hard labor, he carefully marked every lot, and the unmarked graves in the church cemetery, and thoroughly cleaned up the entire cemetery, which was renamed in his honor, The Newman Memorial Cemetery. He was much in demand as a supply pastor and as an interim pastor in several near-by churches. He devoted a great deal of time and energy in his latter days to compiling a history of many of the churches in the Conference, and in a study of genealogy. He had a remarkable memory for names and places and dates. That he maintained the desire to learn and the spirit of enterprise and adventure to the last was evidenced not only by his conversation and his public utterances, but by the fact that during the last two years of his life, he went to the General Council by bus to California, and also attended the International Council of Congregational Churches in Scotland, later making an extended tour of several of the countries of Europe, making at least one part of the journey by plane.

Like his brother Charles, Dr. Newman was a man of unquestioned integrity of character. He lived in such a way that "the ministry was not blamed" to paraphrase Paul's words. He was neat in appearance, quiet, modest, soft-spoken, dignified, devout. He read widely and thought deeply and spoke wisely. He loved God and he loved people. He was a Biblical preacher and a great pastor. He was a sympathetic and warm-hearted counsellor, a man of clear head and warm heart. Friendly in spirit, chaste in speech, fair in judgement, sincere and simple in character, people loved him, believed in him, followed him. He was a good and faithful and fruitful minister of Jesus Christ. Thanks be unto God for him, and for his brother Charles, and his brother John—these three. How incalcuable is the service they rendered and the influence they wielded for our Church and the Kingdom of God!

REVEREND THOMAS JACKSON GREEN

Thomas Jackson Green was born in the Parks Cross Community in North Carolina, on December 31, 1873, and died on March 26, 1954, at the age of 81 years. He spent practically all his life on the old home place engaged in farming in which he was quite successful. At the age of 38 he felt the call to the ministry, combining from that time on his farming with the ministry. He studied at Elon College and served churches nearby. For over thirty years he served as pastor of churches in North Carolina. He was especially gifted in evangelistic work and was much in de-

mand to assist in revivals by his fellow-ministers. He also served as an official of his Conference. He had a capacity for hard work and the willingness to do it. He was held in high regard because of his Christian character, his friendly spirit, his earnest preaching, his pastoral care, his wholesome influence, and his good life. A good and faithful servant of God has fallen asleep, but his good works do follow him.

Robert Lee House was born near Franklinton, North Carolina, on June 9, 1906. He received his early education from his mother who was a school teacher, and who taught him in the home. When he was ten he entered Mt. Olivet Grade School, and later drove the first school bus in Franklin County. Although he had planned to enter Elon College, he finally decided to go to Duke and entered that University in the fall of 1925. He took his A.B. degree in three years and then spent another year in doing graduate work. He later took graduate work at Union Seminary in New York. He was given the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity by Elon College in 1951. He was eminently worthy of this honor by virtue of his character and his career.

While in Duke he served churches in the Eastern North Carolina Conference. His first full-time pastorate was at Newport News, where he served for five years. He did a constructive, substantial work there and laid the foundation for much of the growth and development of the church in succeeding years. After serving acceptably and successfully as pastor of the First Church in Portsmouth for four years, he accepted a call to the Christian Church of Richmond. In this difficult field, made so by a scattered membership and a heavy debt which was a burden on a comparatively small membership, he exhibited qualities of leadership that was impressive and which were recognized throughout the denomination. He left the church free of debt, well-organized, and spiritually alert and active. While serving at Richmond, he became Editor of The Christian Sun, which position he filled until his death, and in which he evidenced fine talent as an editor and a religious journalist. The excellence of his work with The Sun was recognized not only within the bounds of the Southern Convention, but in the larger fellowship of Congregational Christian Churches.

In November, 1949, he left the Richmond Church to become pastor of the Church of the Wide Fellowship in Southern Pines, North Carolina. After making a recovery from a heart attack in the late summer of 1952, he died while listening to President Eiser.hower's inaugural address in January, 1953. Thus at the early age of forty-seven a life already full of achievements, and bright with the promise of even better things was cut short. From the human standpoint it seemed so tragic. But the Lord gave, and the Lord taketh away, blessed be the name of the Lord.

The one word that seems best to describe the man and his life is the word "big." He was big of stature and was big in his seemingly endless energy and his capacity for work. He was big of mind. He read widely and well, and he thought deeply and wisely. He was big in sympathy. He was interested in so many things and he did so many things. Nothing that concerned his church or the cause of Christ was foreign to his interest. He was big in spirit, and in heart. There was nothing petty or provincial about him. His big heart was big enough to take in all that his big mind brought to it. Measured by any true standard for judging a man, Robert Lee House was a big man. And he devoted and consecrated all his talents and energies to the service of God and his fellowmen. Like his Master, he went about doing good.

He was sincere, friendly, human, adventurous, alive, eager, and thoughtful. He had a fine sense of humor. He was a fine and even a great preacher. He was a good pastor. He was a gifted writer with a vocabulary that was the despair of the average writer, and at times of the average reader. He was a true leader. He was a Christian statesman. He was a Kingdom builder. He was a great family man. He was a Christian gentleman. He was one of Christ's good workmen who needed not to be ashamed of his work. God be thanked for Robert Lee House.

REVEREND D. RUFUS MOFFITT

Mr. Moffit who for many years combined industrial work with a preaching ministry, passed away during the biennium. He served churches, off and on, in the bounds of the Western North Carolina Conference, for thirty-three years or more. Many of the churches in that Conference were blessed by his ministry. He was a good man, sincere, honest, consecrated. He was faithful to the church, to the Conference, and to God.

For all the saints who from their labors rest,
Who Thee by faith before the world confessed,
Thy Name, O Jesus, be forever blest. Alleluia!
O blest communion, followship divine!
We feebly struggle, they in glory shine;
Yet all are one in Thee, for all are Thine. Alleluia!
And when the strife is fierce, the warfare long,
Steals on the ear the distant triumph song,
And hearts are brave again, and arms are strong. Alleluia!

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT'S HOME COMMITTEE

We feel that the erection of the Superintendent's Home has been a good investment for the Convention. The funds used to repay the loan of \$9,000 from the Building Society of our Board of Home Missions instead of rent has accured to our benefit. The sum of \$4,725 has been paid on principal, leaving a balance of \$4,275 to be paid as of March 31, 1954, to retire the loan. This balance is being paid at the rate of \$900 per year on principal, plus interest at 3 per cent on the unpaid balance. These payments are included in the Convention Fund budget.

REPORT ON GROUP INSURANCE PLAN

On December 31, 1951, the Group Insurance Plan of the Southern Convention with the Home Life Insurance Company of New York went into effect for pastors, ministerial Convention and Conference officials, full-time lay employees of the churches and institutions of the Convention, and their dependents (wife, and or children under 19 years of age).

We believe this Group Insurance Plan provides at a reasonable rate needed protection for our church servants. Four of the Convention's Conferences pay the premium on the pastor's coverage, while the Eastern Virginia Conference voted to refer the matter to each church for action.

The benefits are:

- 1. For Pastors: \$2000 life insurance, double indemnity for accidental death (\$1000 life insurance for those over 65 years of age); \$7 per day for hospital bed; up to \$70 for "Other" hospital expenses; and up to \$200 for surgical.
- For Full-Time Lay Employees: \$1000 life insurance, double indemnity for accidental death; \$7 per day for hospital bed; up to \$70 for "Other" hospital expenses; and up to \$200 for surgical.
- 3. For Dependents of "1" and "2": \$6 per day for hospital bed; up to \$60 for "Other" hospital expenses; up to \$200 for surgical. (\$60 for maternity cases.) No life insurance for dependents.

The benefits paid have been generous: Life Insurance—2 claims for pastors; Hospitalization claims—pastors, 24; dependents, 37; Surgical claims—pastors and full-time lay employees, 16; dependents, 24.

The Home Life Insurance Company has been prompt and courteous in paying claims totaling \$10,299.90 in two years, while we have paid premiums totaling \$13,743.69 during the same period. It need not be stated that the margin for the Home Life has been small. We refer you to the facts of premiums paid and claims paid as shown below:

The above figures and our excessive claims will give the reason we face an increase in premium rates by the Home Life Insurance Company as of July 1, 1954. We give below the rates, both old and new. We believe it will be a grave mistake for us not to keep this protection. (For your information, we have consulted with two other insurance companies, and they have made no offer to take our plan.) It would be a real harship for some of our church servants for the plan to be discontinued. Some of our pastors, for instance, are uninsurable, while others' ages would make regular insurance rates prohibitive. Comparison of rates and benefits with other insurance companies or hospital plans will show, we believe, that we have a good plan. We had better keep it!

For pastors under 65 years of age old annual rate for \$2,000 life insurance, with accidental death benefits, plus hospitalization and surgery benefits, was \$49.44. The new rate will be \$53.00, and increase of \$3.56 per year.

For pastors over age 65 years, \$1,000 life insurance, plus benefits as above, the old rate was 33.50. The new rate is \$38.00, an increase of \$4.50 per year.

The rate for dependents, hospital and surgical benefits has been increased from \$45.72 to \$57, or \$11.28.

It is very important that all of our eligible pastors and dependents be enrolled. In this manner, the younger and older men will help balance out possible further rate increases. This plan is set up along lines of the commercial organizations, where all are required to participate. We made no such requirement, but it was expected that all pastors, at least, would be willing to cooperate for the benefit of their brethren. The insurance plan has added considerably to the responsibility and work of the Superintendent and the Convention Office, but we are glad to do it because we feel it is a service that ought to be rendered. We do earnestly request all pastors and churches to give their helpful cooperation to and participation in the plan.

Rules Governing Group Insurance Plan Participation

I.—Qualification for Enrollment and Eligibility:

- A. A Minister or Conference or Convention Official to qualify:
 - 1. Must hold Ministerial standing in one of the Conferences of the Southern Convention, being enrolled as ordained or licensed. Pastors should hold their membership in the Conference where they serve churches.
 - 2. Must be regularly called as pastor of a church, elected or employed within the Convention.
 - 3. Must be certified to Convention Office as eligible by Conference Secretary or President.
 - 4. Must make application to Convention Office for enrollment in the plan within 30 days of his eligibility—date of his transfer or receiving standing as ordained or licensed pastor.
 - 5. The above qualifications are conditioned upon Conference or employing church or institution paying required premiums within the prescribed due dates, and further provided that churches served by pastor shall pay their Insurance or Conference Fund.
 - 6. Supply or interim pastors will not be enrolled.
- B. A Full-Time Lay Church Employee to qualify:
 - 1. Must be regularly employed full-time in a church within the Convention, a Conference, the Convention, or one of its institutions.
 - Must be certified as eligible by pastor or other official of the church where employed.
 - 3. Must make application for enrollment in the plan within 30 days of his eligibility.
 - 4. The premiums must be paid by his employing agency within the prescribed due dates.

C. Dependents:

Ministers and full-time lay employees may enroll their dependents (wife, and children under 19 years of age), provided application is made at the time of his own enrollment, or within the rules as set forth in the contract with Home Life Insurance Company, and further provided that the premiums are paid within the prescribed due dates.

II.—Premium Payments:

- 1. All premiums may be paid on a semi-annual basis, though it would save the Convention Office considerable time if paid on an annual basis.
- 2. The due dates of semi-annual premiums will be May 30 and November 30.

 Protection will be discontinued on those premiums which are not paid as of July 1 and January 1.
- 3. Conferences and/or churches, and individuals, for their dependents, will make premium payments to the Southern Convention Office, Elon College, N. C.

III.—Discontinuing Insurance:

- 1. If a person enrolled ceases to be a pastor or a full-time lay employee as above prescribed, his insurance and that of his dependents will cease after 31 days, unless special arrangement is made as provided in the contract with the Home Life Insurance Company.
- If any coverage is dropped, reinstatement may not be made except by special arrangement as provided by the contract with the Home Life Insurance Company.

Recommendations

1. That pastors enrolled in the future not giving full time to the ministry or related Christian service (one who earns a part of his livelihoor at secular employment) be limited to \$1,000 life insurance.

- That no new pastor over 65 years of age, coming to the Convention after June 1, 1954, will be eligible for coverage.
- 3. That all eligible pastors and/or full-time church employees be requested to enroll on a Conference basis by July 1, 1954.
- 4. That all eligible pastors and/or full-time church employees be requested to participate for their eligible dependents by July 1, 1954.

While much of the work of the Group Insurance Puan has fallen upon the Superintendent and Miss Edna M. Fitch, Assistant Treasurer, we acknowledge the valuable counsel of Dr. Stanley C. Harrell and Dr. Henry E. Robinson, who with the Superintendent. were constituted a special Insurance Committee by the Executive Board. We have also called for counsel Rev. G. C. Crutchfield and Mr. J. V. Simpson, who are well acquainted with insurance. The Home Life Insurance representatives have at all times been available for counsel and assistance.

The above assets include receipt of \$3,955.82 cash from the Eastern Virginia Conference Ministerial Educational Fund, repayment of loans, interest on savings certificate, balance of the Fund as reported to the 1952 session of the Convention, and notes.

One loan has been made during the biennium. Through Superintendent Scott and Treasurer Colclough, several notes have been collected, and we have endeavored to collect past due notes as instructed by the Convention. We wish to acknowledge the receipt of funds and notes from the Eastern Virginia Conference, which merged their Ministerial Educational Fund with the Convention's Fund.

For your information, there are now four current notes totalling \$640.00, which are subject to payment or renewal on an annual basis. The rest of the notes, amounting to \$7,279.56, are past due, and some of these are as much as 43 years old. We expect to continue our efforts to settle all past due notes, and to keep the current loans on an annual basis.

We make the following recommendations to the Convention for action:

- 1. That we by vote express our thanks to the Eastern Virginia Conference for merging their funds with those of the Convention.
- 2. That the Committee be empowered to continue its efforts to settle all past due notes to the best advantage, as authorized by the 1952 session of the Convention.
- 3. The Southern Convention Ministerial Student Loan Fund is a Fund of the Convention. The present arrangement whereby Elon College serves as Custodian makes it necessary for both the College and the Convention to keep books on the account, thereby consuming considerable unnecessary time and effort. It is, therefore, recommended that the Convention Treasurer become the Custodian of these funds as

of June 1, 1954, and that Elon College be instructed to turn all assets over to the Treasurer of the Southern Convention, including the amount of \$1,330.96 due from the General Fund of Elon College.

4. That the Ministerial Scholarship Fund and the Ministerial Student Loan Fund of the Convention Committees be consolidated—it being understood that the accounts. of the funds be kept separate—that the Executive Board appoint the Committee, and that the Committee report to the Executive Board annually and to the Convention, biennially

EXHIBIT 27

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL ACTION

The Committee has not undertaken any particular projects during the biennium. The report is not of tasks accomplished, but it is hoped that the report will direct attention to areas in which accomplishments can and should be achieved. The need for Christian witness and action is evident in the social order of which we are a part. Certain concerns perhaps are more pressing at the present time than are others,

1. We urge the churches of the Southern Convention to combat the extension of legal liquor traffic to areas now "dry," and the efforts to make it possible to serve liquor "by the drink"; and we urge the churches, when success appears probable, to seek by vote to do away with legal liquor in areas now "wet."

We commend the churches that have been engaged in this activity during the biennium.

2. We urge the churches of the Southern Convention to combat every effort to introduce legalized gambling into the States of North Carolina and Virginia, and to seek to drive it out in those localities in which it is presently situated.

The most pressing social problem of the moment in this area is that of race relations. In this regard, we submit the following recommendations for action by this Convention:

- 1. That the Convention request its several member Conferences to exchange Fraternal Delegates with the Negro Congregational Christian Conferences in their areas.
- 2, That the Convention request the Ministerial Associations of the Conferences to seek to meet at regular times with the similar groups of the Negro ministers; and that the Associations seek to become inter-racial or to form an interracial group for the area.
- 3. That the Convention by resolution make known to the Governors of North Carolina and Virginia its conviction that, in the event the Supreme Court rules that segregation in the public schools is unconstitutional, the ruling should be received in good faith and the system of public schools maintained on a nonsegregated basis.

EXHIBIT 4

REPORT OF WOMAN'S FELLOWSHIP

On October 8, 1953, at Bethlehem Church, the Woman's Missionary Conference heard the following recommendation read, and voted to accept it:

"That since we are part of the National Woman's Fellowship and since our program includes Bible study, personal and family spiritual development as well as Mission study, we recommend that we suggest to the Convention, that the name, Woman's Fellowship of the Southern Convention be used, and in that event that this Conference be known as the Woman's Fellowship of the Valley Conference."

At this same session, the Conference voted to accept an increase in apportion-

ment for the 1953-55 Biennium from \$1,000 to \$1,250 a year.

During the past year, twelve churches have raised \$1,167.04 of their apportionment; \$130.75 for the "Goats to Puerto Rico" project, and \$59.00 for soundscriber equipment, making a total of \$1,297.79 raised by our women during the year. Several of the groups have centered their efforts on local projects: such as remodeling programs and educational buildings.

It is my wish that the seven churches that do not have Women's Fellowships would organize during the coming year and greatly increase our present membership of 443. If these churches, together with those who did not make a financial report last year would contribute to Missions through these channels, we would not only

reach our goal, but go over the top.

"Out of the Heart of the Gospel" will be the theme for 1954-55. The Bible study will be the Book of Acts. Layettes and sheets, matress covers and aprons for Fisk University, will be a few of the "Friendly Service" projects this year. The Thank Offering will go to the new South Boston Church, and Life Memberships and Memorials go again this year to Franklin, at Bricks, N. C.

May we have your prayerful interest in the many tasks of women working to-

gether in the fellowship of the Lord Jesus Christ.

We report that rather little has been done by our local churches and by our Conference as such in carrying out the recommendations of the Social Action Committee made one year ago. However, we note that the Conference Woman's Fellowship passed a strong resolution supporting the Supreme Court's decision for an end of segregation in the public schools. And we note that Conference young people discussed the matter at their most recent rally with two Negro educators as leaders. We highly commend and praise both the Women and the Young People for these actions.

As this Conference is a member of the three organizations mentioned, we in turn urge our people to work and witness for a peaceful end of segregation in the public schools.

First. that the Eastern Virginia Conference accept the recommendation of its ministers and authorize the Executive Committee of the Eastern Virginia Conference, in cooperation with the Superintendent of the Southern Convention and officials of the College, to proceed with plans and a campaign to secure the \$150,000 for a dormitory for girls, that the churches in the Valley Conference be requested to give full cooperation, and the Eastern Virginia Conference issues a challenge to the conferences in North Carolina to raise a like amount from the churches in North Carolina.

Second, that the campaign be for \$150,000 to be secured in cash and pledges as a part of the Centennial Program of Advance, and that it be completed not later than December 31, 1956.

The report of the Treasurer was presented, and on motion it was voted that it be received and referred to the Finance Committee. (See Exhibit 4.)

By common consent it was agreed to postpone the time for adjournment.

The following reports were presented and by vote of the Conference were adopted: Committee on Ministerial Education (Exhibit 5), Committee on Home Missions (Exhibit 6), and the Christian Missionary Association (Exhibit 7).

The president appointed the following committee to conduct the service of licensure for Samuel D. Nelson at the evening service: Dr. H. S. Hardcastle, chairman; Dr. Jesse H. Dollar and Rev. A. Lanson Granger, Jr.

The afternoon session adjourned after the benediction by Rev. Clyde O. Koon.

WEDNESDAY—EVENING SESSION

The Conference service of worship and Holy Communion was conducted by Rev. Melvin Dollar and Rev. Olin B. Pendleton. The choir and deacons of the Rosemont Church and the deacons of the First Church, Norfolk, participated in the service..

The service of licensure for Samuel D. Nelson was conducted by Dr. H. S. Hardcastle. Dr. Jesse H. Dollar, Rev. A. Lanson Granger, Jr. and Rev. O. D. Povthress shared in the service.

The Conference Sermon was delivered by Dr. Sidney M. Berry.

THURSDAY—MORNING SESSION

The Conference was called to order at 9:30 a.m., by President J. Everette Neese. The opening hymn was led by Rev. O. D. Poythress, and the prayer for divine guidance was by Rev. Morris E. Taylor.

The following reports were presented, and by vote of Conference were adopted: The Eastern Virginia Youth Fellowship (Exhibit 8) The Eastern Virginia Sunday School Convention (Exhibit 9), The Eastern Virginia Laymen's Fellowship (10), and the Committee on Religious Literature (Exhibit 11).

The report of the Committee on Social Action was presented and its adoption moved and seconded. After considerable discussion, an amend-

ment to the report was offered but failed to carry. The report was adopted by a recorded vote of 49 to 9. (See Exhibit 12.)

The report of the Committee on Apportionments (Exhibit 13) was presented and adopted. On motion it was voted that a rising vote of thanks be given to the chairman and members of the committee and that the chairman be directed to submit a bill for the expenses involved in producing the report.

Dr. Sidney M. Berry addressed the Conference on the work of the International Congregational Council and told of his findings on his trips to visit Congregational Christian Churches around the world. At the conclusion of his address, a rising vote of thanks was given to Dr. Berry for his contributions to this session of Conference.

Dr. Stanley C. Harrell, Editor, reported to the Conference various plans and needs of *The Christian Sun*.

Dr. Jesse H. Dollar, president of the Southern Convention, presented the "Centennial Program of Advance" of the 1954-56 Biennium of the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches. On motion it was voted that the Conference support the program.

On motion it was voted that the report of the Nominating Committee be adopted. There being no nominations from the floor, it was voted that the secretary be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot. The president declared the following officers elected:

> President, Rev. J. Everette Neese; Vice-President, Mr. W. B. Williams; Secretary, Rev. J. H. Lightbourne, Jr.; Treasurer, Mr. G. Chapman White.

Rev. Wayne W. Womer of the Virginia Church Temperance Council; Rev. Aubrey C. Todd, First Unitarian Church, Norfolk, Va., and Miss Irene Haga, director of Religious Education, Congregational Christian Temple, Norfolk, Va., were presented to the Conference.

The morning session was adjourned following the benediction by Rev. George D. Alley.

THURSDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

A worship service was conducted by Rev. George D. Alley, following which Rev. Wayne W. Womer of the Virginia Church Temperance Council addressed the Conference on the work of the council.

The reports of the Committee on Christian Education (Exhibit 14), the Eastern Virginia Woman's Missinnary Conference (Exhibit 15), and the Committee on Foreign Missions (Exhibit 16), were presented and by vote of Conference were adopted.

Dr. Jesse H. Dollar reported that as matters now stand the proposed merger between the Evangelical and Reformed Church and the Congregational Christian Churches likely will become effective in 1957.

The report of the Finance Committee (Exhibit 17) was presented and adopted.

Mrs. W. V. Leathers reported for the Committee on Place that an invitation for the 1955 session of Conference had been received from The Congergational Christian Temple. On motion it was voted that the invitation be accepted.

The report of the Committee on Resolutions was presented and was adopted. (Exhibit 18).

On motion it was voted that the president appoint representatives to the Virginia Council of Churches, the Interdenominational Religious Works Foundation and the Virginia Church Temperance Council.

On motion it was voted that the Conference records and minutes for the year be printed in THE ANNUAL, and that 300 copies be secured and pro-rated among the churches.

On motion it was voted that the president and secretary complete and approve the minutes of this session of Conference.

On motion it was voted that this session of Conference commends to the Executive Committee the practice of beginning the Conference at 2:00 p.m. of the first day and having a full-day session on the second day.

The president appointed the Standing Committees for the ensuing year (See Standing Committees).

On motion it was voted that Conference adjourn, following the report of the Committee on Memoirs (Exibit 19) and a Memorial Service for Dr. N. G. Newman, conducted by Dr. I. W. Johnson, and that it meet again its 135th annual session with The Congregational Christian Temple, Norfolk, Virginia, on Wednesday and Thursday before the first Sunday in November, 1955.

We are glad to report that the Rev. Fred P. Register has accepted the position of Secretary for Stewardship and Evangelism in the Southern Convention. We urge you to support him in this work and to call upon him for suggestions and help in your Stewardship program. He will be able to suggest to you many fine materials which are now available in this field. Use these materials and supplement them with your own Christian insights.

EXHIBIT 3 REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM

We, your Committee on Evangelism, submit the following report:

The committee rejoices in the growing interest our pastors are showing in the year-round program of Evangelism. This interest finds expression in the conviction that the pastors and laity should be continually "Seeking to save souls," day-in and day-out, believing that God is able to save men and women, boys and girls, for the Kingdom in all seasons, as well as in special seasons of "revivalistic" effort.

Evangelism is the recruiting work of the Church and of the Kingdom. We believe that the work of the Church is three-fold. First, the work of Evangelism, the winning of decisions for Christ; Second, the work of Christian Education, the building up of lives in Christ, and Third, the work of Christian Commission, sending out lives in definite service for Christ.

If we correctly understand the spirit of our times, there seems to be a spiritual awakening among the ministers and laity of out churches. The attendance, interest and contributions have all increased during the past year. We believe the time is ripe for a *Great Evangelistic Crusade*. The day of the revival should not die out, but this, however, is only one phase of Evangelism. Visitation Evangelism, Pastcral Evangelism, and Educational Evangelism are other methods of Evangelism which your committee believes should be used. Perhaps these latter methods could be used more effectively in some churches than the "Old Fashioned Revival" method.

The fires of Evangelism must be kept burning brightly upon the altars of our churches in the interest of Evangelism. If we fail to win people to Christ, we will have no opportunity to build lives up in Christ or to send lives out for Christ.

Your Committee on Evangelism believes that every pastor should do the work of an evangelist. We believe that the members of every local church should share with the pastor the responsibility and the privilege of soul-saving, and that every member of the church should pray to almighty God for help in enabling each member of the church to win at least one soul for Christ and the Church each year. Not

until the men and women of our churches accept their personal responsibility in Evangelism can the church move forward as our Lord expects it to move

We recommend:

1. That the comprehensive program as outlined by the Executive Committee of the Southern Convention for Evangelism be adopted by the Conference as follows:

A PROGRAM OF ADVANCE THROUGH EVANGELISM

In this basic task of Evangelism, we echo again the commission of Jesus, "Ye are my witnesses." In fulfilling this mandate—the faithful communication of the Gospel, the good news of God's redeeming grace as given in Christ Jesus our Saviour and Master, we are confidently confessing what we believe to be "the hope of the world."

Everything we long to do for the redemption of this world awaits a vital, authentic Evangelism.

The beginning of Evangelism is to call our present membership of 35,000 to a renewal of personal commitment to Christ and his Church. The Church is first a field, and afterward a force, for Evangelism.

We are called upon to restore to active church relationship all inactive members, whose inattendance is dangerously near the point of denial.

We are called upon to reach out into all our communities to find the unchurcher by careful survey. On the average, throughout the nation, almost one-half of our population has no spiritual home. Some of these may be as near as next door. And it is a most disturbing fact that of the unchurched population, 26 millions are between the ages of 8 and 24.

We call upon our churches to plan a comprehensive program of Evangelistic effort, including such as

Church membership training classes, especially for youth;

Lay visitation of the discovered prospects;

Special seasonal missions appropriate to the observance of the Christian year;

Preaching missions; and

Family daily devotions.

Whatever other methods have proved effective, these, too, should be faithfully followsd.

THE GOAL: "Eight thousand (8,000) new members by December 31, 1956." This requires each church to bring into the Christian fellowship a minimum of one member per month for each one hundred members of the church.

To this primary purpose the Convention calls upon each church to have an *Organization for Evangelism*, representative of all the departments of the local church and parish.

The importance of this witnessing to the Gospel, and this need for winning of disciples to the Christian fellowship, calls us to the clearest understanding of the message and method of Jesus, and the fullest expression of his compassionate mood.

To assist the churches in their fulfillment of these objectives, the Convention offers the leadership and services of the newly appointed Secretary of Stewardship and Evangelism.

2. That we give Rev. Fred P. Register, our newly elected Secretary of Evangelism and Stewardship, our united support in promoting this program.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION

We, the members of this committee, submit herewith the following report:

Your Committee recommended to the Executive Committee of the Conference that Licentiate Paul Victor Varga be ordained as a minister of the Eastern Virginia Conference. Mr. Varga was completing his seminary work in June and was planning to serve as a pastor during the summer months, and desired ordination before taking up that temporary work, and his permanent work in the fall. The Executive Committee approved the recommendation, and the President of the Conference, Rev. J. Everette Neese, appointed the following Committee as an Ordaining Presbytery: Dr. I. W. Johnson, Dr. W. M. Stevens, Reverend R. E. Brittle, Reverend J. E. Mc-Cauley and Reverend H. S. Hardcastle, the Chairman of this Committee. As Chairman, I invited Reverend J. E. Neese, as president of the Conference, to take part in the service and to preside at the service. Reverend John Gallo, pastor of the Bethlehem (Disputanta), or Begonia, Church was also asked to assist in the service. The service was held in Mr. Varga's home church, the Bethlehem (Begonia) Congregational Christian Church, Disputanta, Virginia, on May 30, 1954, before a capacity congregation. It was an impressive and memorable service. A Certificate of Ordination officially signed has been presented to Mr. Varga. The Committee, with the approval of the Executive Committee, also presented Paul with a beautiful Bible, suitably inscribed.

This Committee voted to accept Rev. John W. Rackley, who was serving as Pastor of the Hopewell Congregational Christian Church, as an ordained minister, duly accredited by the Disciples Church, with the status of Conference Ordination.

We make the following recommendations:

- 1. That Lewis Godin, Adolph G. Melberg, Jr., Glenn Garrett and Richard Cooke be continued as members of the Biblical Class at Elon College and that George Barron, at his own request, be dropped as a member of the Biblical Class.
- 2. That Joseph S. Bage, C. Baxter Twiddy, Jr., Henry A. Gleason, Jr., and Reuben Askew be continued as Licentiates of the Conference. Licentiate John G. Truitt, Jr., is recommended to the New Jersey Association of Congregational Christian Churches and upon acceptance there his name will be dropped from this roll.
- 3. That Samuel D. Nelson, a candidate for Licensure of the North Carolina and Virginia Conference, be received into our Fellowship, and that he be licensed at this session of the Conference. We request that the President appoint a Committee to be responsible for this service of Licensure at such time as may be found convenient and appropriate during the Conference.
- 4. That the Conference Ordinations of Reverends D. D. Nash, M. E. Taylor and John Gallo be renewed for another year.

- 5. That the names of Reverends J. Victor Murchison, John W. Rackley and Van T. Crawford be dropped from our Ministerial Roll.
- 6. That the Reverends George D. Alley, Ciyde O. Koon, Olin B. Pendleton and Harry G. Titcombe be received into our Fellowship and that Reverend Raymond T. Grissom, who soon will become Pastor of the Holy Neck Congregational Christian Church, be received as a member of this Conference upon presentation of his official credentials.
- 7. That Reverend R. Eugene Tally be granted a letter of transfer to the Eastern North Carolina Conference. Reverend Paul V. Varga has been granted a letter of transfer to the Merrimack Association of Congregational Christian Churches of New Hampshire.
- 8. That our Pastors give more attention to the matter of trying to interest and to enlist more of our prominent young men and women in the calling and commitment to full-time Christian work or vocation.

This type meeting was very successful and interesting to everyone. Through cooperation of the city and rural churches we sent peanut hay to the Orphanage farm for livestock feed due to the food shortage last winter.

The interest in the Laymen Movement is rapidly increasing and we are working toward more organized laymen groups in the Churches. Most of the Churches in our conference recognized Laymen's Sunday this year by presenting programs by Laymen in the Church. We are thinking of ways and means of raising money to carry out the program at Moonelon, which was accepted by the laymen of the convention as a project.

An interesting program has been arranged and we are expecting a large crowd of laymen from the churches of the conference.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL ACTION

As Christians, we are constrained by our faith to be obedient to Christ, and to seek to show forth the leve made known through Him in every area of our life. At the same time we are citizens of a world which at one point after another denies or even refuses to acknowledge the love of Christ. How to live according to Christian love in a world which dishonors the Christian Way is the continual task which confronts us in the churches.

This report and appeal to the churches of our Conference deals with only one phase of our task of exercising Christian love in our human relations; namely, that presented by the recent decision of the Supreme Court concerning racial integration in the public schools. While your committee has no desire to overlook or to minimize other social concerns which rest upon the conscience of the Church, it is our opinion that it is within the area of the issues raised by the Court decision that we at present confront our most urgent imperative and our greatest immediate challenge and opportunity.

The decision handed down by the Court reaches to the very core of our attitudes as Christians. Moreover, how we react to this decision may have as direct a bearing upon lessening or increasing the tensions of our world, and of contributing to or diminishing peace in the world, as anything we at present may do.

We would say to the churches that it is our opinion that this issue cannot and will not be resolved by legal means alone. What is required of us is patience and forbearance, and every possible attempt at understanding on the part of all our citizenry, and especially by us of the Christian Church. It is because these attitudes are in part what the Church of Christ exists to create in us and in our society that it therefore becomes the especial task and responsibility of the churches to determine, not how we can evade or avoid this responsibility, but how we can meet it and deal with it realistically.

We do not wish to minimize the difficulties which are presented as a consequence of the Court decision. The decision presents a challenge to what has been the cultural pattern and way of life we have known over several decades. We acknowledge that we in the churches have not done enough to help prepare the way for the decision which now we must face. But face it we must, as those for whom the love of Christ is the norm of our decisions and our actions

This appeal we direct to our churches.

First, that we affirm our belief as Christians in the worth and dignity of every individual before God. We believe that every person is a child of God, that he has dignity and worth, which is in no way dependent upon the circumstances of his earthly existence. We acknowledge that we live under the Constitution of a land and under the constitution of a universe which recognizes that every man is endowed by His Creator with "certain inalienable rights," that is, rights which belong to him by the very fact that he is a man, created in the image of God and loved by God, rights which therefore no state may abridge or deny or ignore, except at its peril.

Secondly, that we would reafirm the vote of our Conference last year, which said in part, "that within our churches we seek in every way possible to assure that whatever decision the Court may hand down shall be accepted."

Thirdly, that we appeal to our churches and our ministers to work together to create opportunities in their churches for the first-hand discussions, looking towards an honest facing of the issues before us.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON APPORTIONMENTS

Attached to this report is the schedule of apportionments of all churches of the Eastern Virginia Conference for the year 1954-55 requested by the Southern Convention, approved by the Executive Committee of your Conference and apportioned by your Apportionment Committee and which we hope has been approved by the churches when budgets were made up for the conference year 1954-55.

Your committee used the apportionment table of 1953-54 with percentage increases under each heading requested by the Southern Convention. The formula suggested by the Convention based on *Membership*, *Home Expenses and Apportionment Giving* was carefully considered but due to the many inequalities we felt that the formula used heretofere with percentage increases would be better for all of the churches.

The Committee on Finance of the Southern Convention has endeavored to devise a plan for reducing the number of special appeals. To that end it has been necessary to increase the apportionment to a more realistic figure. In lieu of the Sustaining Fund for Elon College as a "Special" the Southern Convention recommended an increased apportionment for the college which is included in the apportionment table.

It should be noted that the Convention Home Missions and Church Extension Fund includes total Mission Board administrative expenses currently shared by the National Home Missions and Foreign Missions. We understand this will make for better bookkeeping it these expenses are carried in one fund.

The total amount apportioned by the Southern Convention for this conference was \$49,477.00. When the \$2,289.00 requested for the Conference purposes is added to this we have the grand total of \$51,766.00 as shown in the apportionment table.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Committee on Christian Education met once during the conference year. At this meeting plans were made for the area Missionary Institutes which were held in Waverly, Suffolk and Rosemont, under the leadership of Miss Ione Catton. The Missionary Institutes which were held this year instead of the training schools that have been conducted heretofore. The response from those who attended the institutes was gratifying.

A questionnaire was sent to the ministers of the conference seeking information related to the work of Christian education. Replies were received representing twenty-six churches. In the Sunday Schools of these Churches there are enrolled 5,320 people with an average attendance of 3,700. There are 921 attending Sunday School who do not attend the Church service of worship, and 850 who attend the Church service of worship but do not attend Sunday School.

From the reporting churches 54 youth went to the Summer Conference at Elon College, and 75 attended the Junior High Camp at Bayside.

Twelve of the twenty-six churches have a Workers Council, while sixteen have a program for special teacher training.

We commend the churches for the progress that is being made in Christian Education and pray that our vision may be enlarged and our services more effective.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY CONFERENCE

The Forty-second annual session of the Woman's Missionary Conference met at the Oakland Congregational Christian Church, Chuckatuck, on Thursday, October 7, 1954, beginning at ten o'clock with the President, Mrs. Garlland Spratley, presiding. Mrs. B. V. Hargrave, of Franklin, led the service of devotion, using the theme "Out of the Heart of the Gospel." Mrs. A. L. Wagner, President of the Oakland Woman's Auxiliary, extended a cordial welcome to the ministers, visitors and members of the local societies, there being over 300 persons present to respond to the greetings. Miss Jennie Doidge of Boston, Mass., Associate Executive Secretary of the Missions Council of the Congregational Christian Churches, was the guest speaker. She spoke on "Pictures on my Heart" as seen in her travels around the world. Mrs. George D. Alley of Suffolk sang as a solo, "O, Savior Sweet," after which Mrs. E. G. Middleton, Chairman of the Life Memberships and Memorials conducted an impressive Memorial Service. After honoring the holders of the Life Membership Certificates, she paid tribute to those who are no longer here, lighting three candles in memory of Dr. N. G. Newman, Mrs. Jennie Willis Bradford and Mrs. Elizabeth Hargrove.

The Superintendents of the Districts and the various departmental leaders of the conference gave encouraging reports and referred to the Report Booklets which had been prepared and distributed by Mrs Ray Gordan and Mrs, R. E. Brittle. Mrs. George Cornell, the Treasurer, reported a total of \$10,273.35 had been contributed, of which \$1,118.56 was the Thank Offering. The amount contributed for Life Memberships and Memorials was \$630.00, which will go to the Franklin Center at Bricks, North Carolina. Mrs. L. W. Stagg presented the Thank Offering project for this year, urging the women to respond generously to the new church in South Boston, Virginia.

The conference expressed their thanks and appreciation to Miss Pattie Lee Coghill, who has rendered invaluable service to the work of the churches among the children, young people and women.

An executive board meeting was held on February 3rd at Suffolk to plan the program for the Spring District Meetings. On September 2nd the executive board met to discuss plans for the Fall Conference. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

Though the guns of war and destruction are almost hushed, the wounds are still fresh and bleeding. Half the people of the world are less than half fed, and millions are on the brink of starvation. Many are starving. These unfortunates, homeless and hungry, are casualties of the wars of our generation.

If the church is to prove itself worthy of a place of honor in the hearts and minds of men, it must speed up its ministries to the needy peoples of the world.

Aside from the regular apportionments to our Christian Mission, which are channeled through the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions, we have other agencies through which we serve effectively and in cooperation with other churches. Among these are Church World Service, whose address for the churches in our conference is, New Windsor, Maryland. Clothing of all kinds is desperately needed. We urge that every church in the Eastern Virginia Conference gather all the clothing possible, new and used, and send it to New Windsor, Md., for processing. It may be designated as desired.

Other agencies of great value are CROP and CARE. Any group interested can get the dates of "pick-ups" by writing to the Virginia Council of Churches, 109 Grace Street., Richmond, Virginia. A truck will be sent if materials are collected at some place in the community.

Our Congregational Christian Service Committee, 110 East 29th Street, New York 16, N. Y., can handle money sent for either CROP or CARE and will buy and send CARE packages to any point you designate. Otherwise they will send them where the need seems most acute.

More recently another great agent is put at the command of our churches. It is S. O. S. (Share Our Surplus). The U. S. Government has made available great quantities of surplus foods for distribution by the churches. It is without purchase price; the only money needed is to process and deliver it. One dollar in cash will deliver \$20.00 worth of food to the hungry. If our church people will take this opportunity seriously it can help in two ways: These foods are our farm surpluses which the Government has bought from us. The storage alone cost millions of dollars every year, and we have to pay it! Now, we have the opportunity of moving these surpluses out into a destitute world.

In gratitude to the God of our bounty let us, in Christ's Name and for their sake, share our dollars to deliver these life-giving foods to our hungry neighbors.

This is not to neglect giving through our regular channels. This must be done so that our regular denominational program of Christian World Mission may be carried on. Increased giving is needed to make it more effective, and to help to guarntee that the present truce may become the peace of the world for which we have prayed.

We recommend to our Pastors, Laymen, Women and Youth Organizations, that immediate action be taken by them to implement the above agencies for Christian Services to the needy peoples everywhere.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS

Since adjournment of the last session of this Conference, one of our very faithful ministers has passed from our visible presence and entered into the fellowship of the victorious, redeemed by the blood of our Saviour. Dr. Nathaniel Gross Newman was born in Nansemond County, Virginia, on a farm west of the Nansemond River, not far from Reids Ferry. Later the family moved to a farm near Everets where they remained untill their death.

The sons and daughters in the Newman family attended Oakland Sunday School and became members of the church. As is well known, three sons became prominent ministers in the Christian Church—Drs. John U. Newman, N. G. Newman and C. E. Newman. The family contributed much to the development of Oakland Church and to the denomination in many fields.

Dr. N. G. Newman was educated in the Suffolk Collegiate Institute, Graham Normal College and Elon College, from which he graduated with high honors. Later he did graduate work in the University of North Carolina, Chicago University and Columbia University.

He was ordained to the ministry in the Franklin Christian Church, November 15, 1892. He served as pastor the following churches in the Eastern Virginia Conference: Berea (Nansemond), Holy Neck, and Holland. He also served at both Defiance College, Defiance, Ohio, and Elon College, Elon College, North Carolina, as pastor and teacher. He served Holy Neck Church at three different periods in his ministry: first, when that church was in a charge with Franklin Christian Church and the Berea Church; later, when it was in a charge with Holland Church; and finally, when it was a full time charge, where he remained until his retirement in 1937, due to failing health.

After retirement he moved to his farm which he had previously purchased from the Newman heirs—the home where his parents spent their last years. Dr. Newman's wife died in 1940, but he kept his home intact and, much of the summertime each year, he did his own housekeeping, cooking and caring for his garden. His health greatly improved from the outdoor activity, and he was a great asset to the Oakland Christian Church until his final illness and death.

This paper is already somewhat lengthy for an occasion of this kind, as a number of articles have already appeared in *The Christian Sun*, giving some of the details of his life and work in our church. On this account we will not go into other details of his useful life and ministry.

It was my happy privilege to be closely associated with him for many years. This association included frequent friendly contacts with him during the sixteen years of his retirement—twelve of which I was his pastor at Oakland Church. Briefly we submit an appraisal—to some extent—of this very useful minister.

He was a man of God. Apart from the fact that he was a minister, he was a wonderful man. He was a combination of dignity and humility to an extent that gave him power which commanded respect from all who knew him. His face, his manner, his attitude on all occasions, his personality—all suggested honor, integrity, purity of speech, high ideals and rugged honesty.

As a minister he set for himself, and for the churches he served, a high standard of life and service. He was a close student, he carefully prepared his sermons, he labored faithfully to lead his people into a higher standard of living and into a closer fellowship with Christ as Lord and Master. He had a pastoral heart. He

loved people. He drew his congregations by his friendly, understanding spirit. He was gifted with a fine spirit of humour which served a useful purpose in pastoral visiting. But he set a high standard, never indulging in any suggestive wit in his social contacts. He hated so-called smutty jokes—and declined ever to laugh when one was told in his presence.

His personal habits were above reproach. He lived above suspicion. He did not smoke. He was economical in his use of money for himself. He was liberal in his gifts to the cause of Christ. He cultivated a friendly spirit towards other ministers. He did not envy his fellow-laborers in the church. He was a friend to all. He was too broad-minded to be critical of greatness in others; he was too good to be unkind.

Therefore, we commend him and his manner of life to our fellow ministers as an example of goodness and greatness to be emulated by young and old.

Be it resolved:

- That we record our sincere appreciation of his life and work in our Conference and Denomination;
- That we share our sympathy with the family and pray God's richest blessings upon them;
- 3. That a copy of this report be recorded in the records of this Conference and sent to the family of the deceased; and that a copy be offered to *The Christian Sun* for publication.

Rev. Fred P. Register presented a report on the Education and Standing of the Ministry (Exhibit 7). The report was adopted by Conference.

Dr. Sidney M. Berry of London, England, then addressed the Conference on "Congregationalism Around the World."

The Conference adjourned for lunch.

TUESDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session was called to order at 2:00 p.m., by the president. Rev. Eugene Tally led a brief devotional service.

President L. E. Smith presented a report on Elon College, after which he introduced a resolution to the Conference as to the Elon College Campaign Fund, which was adopted. (See exhibit 8.)

Following the report of the Social Action Committee by the chairman, Rev. William Grissom, Rev. Carl Key addressed the Conference. The report on Social Action was then adopted. (See Exhibit 9.)

There was a brief recess for the meeting of the Christian Missionary Association.

The report of the Nominating Committee was presented by the chairman, Rev. Frank Apple, and the secretary was instructed to cast a unonimous ballot for the election of these officers. (See Exhibit 11.)

The Rev. Fred P. Register presented his resignation as a member of the Executive Board of the Southern Convention, which was accepted.

The report of the Committee on Place was presented and adopted. (See Exhibit 12.)

The afternoon session adjourned at 5:30 p.m.

TUESDAY—EVENING SESSION

The evening session of the Conference was called to order by the president at 6:45.

The report of the Finance Committee was presented by Prof. L. I. Vaughn, chairman, and adopted as read. (See Exhibit 13.)

The report of the Treasurer was adopted. (See Exhibit 14.)

The secretary gave the report of the Executive Committee, which was adopted. (See Exhibit 15.)

The following motion was presented and passed:

VOTED: That this Conference request the North Carolina and Virginia Conference (or the body holding title) to approve the granting of a loan to the Piney Plains Church by the Church Building Society and the issuance of a mortgage for \$3,000 in the church property to cover same.

On request from the Wentworth Church for its title to be transferred to the church, it was voted that the matter be referred to the North Carolina Conference of the Christian Church.

On motion of the secretary of the Conference, the following resolution was passed:

The Eastern North Carolina Conference requests the Executive Board of the Southern Convention to consider a revision of the table of apportionments before the next meeting of the Southern Convention and the granting of a larger proportion of the benevolence giving to the foreign missionary work of our church.

A motion was made and passed that Carl J. Dixon be licensed by the Executive Committee at one of the churches in which he is now serving.

Voted to order 150 Annuals for distribution to the churches.

It was voted that after the evening service of worship was concluded, the Conference stand adjourned.

A devotional service was conducted by Rev. George M. Tally. The Rev. Charles Jones spoke on "The Task of the Church," after which Rev. Gaylord Noyce and Rev. George Tally conducted a Service of Communion.

EXHIBIT 1

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON APPORTIONMENTS

In preparing this report the committee wishes to call to the attention of the churches comprising the Eastern North Carolina Conference two facts: (1) That the Finance Committee of the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches recommends that the giving on apportionments for the Conference be \$20,475 for 1954-'55 as compared with \$13,058 for 1953-'54.

This does not mean that any church will be required to give much more, if any, since all special offerings taken for our Convention Institutions and Agencies may be credited by the local church on the apportionments for these institutions and agencies. Heretofore this has not been the case with respect to special offerings. In other words, all funds designated for a specific purpose whether in the budget, raised by special offerings, or given by individual members of a local church, may go to the designated purpose but may be credited to the apportionment for that purpose.

Further, should the total giving for some one objective, through ways as designated above, be in excess of the apportioned amount for this desginated objective the excess may be credited on another apportionment item if the local church so desires.

(2) That the committee used a formula in determining the several apportionment items based on Conference Totals for a three year period (1950, 1951, 1952) on Membership, Home Expenses, and Apportionment Giving. The amount of each of these items for the three year period were added, then divided by three (3) to get the average for each of these items for the three year period. Next, the local church totals for the same three year period and for the same items were likewise calculated. Then the amount given by each local church for the same period and the same item, namely; Membership, Home Expenses, and Apportionment Giving, was expressed as a percentage of the Conference Total. The three percentages so obtained were added and divided by three (3) to get the Average Percentage for each local church.

To get the amount of any apportioned item which each church should give, just multiply the Conference apportionment item by the average percentage of the local church.

The accompaning table gives the individual amounts of each apportioned item for each local church in the Conference.

The committee can only point out the responsibility of each church on a basis of equity in giving and hope that each church will assume its proportionate share of the total amount requested of the Conference by the Southern Convention.

EXHIBIT 2

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP

Many political and religious leaders of today are declaring that the only hope for civilization is a change of heart upon the part of men and nations. We believe that only The Lord Jesus Christ can bring about this change of heart. Jesus Christ is the only hope of this world, and it is up to those of us who know Him as Personal Saviour, to make Him known to the world. To do this we must renew our efforts to enlist all our people in the stewardship of personality, power, and possessions.

We believe that men without Christ are lost, and can be saved only by the grace of God through faith in Jesus Christ. Therefore, the first and most important work of the church today, is carrying the Gospel to those who are lost. "For . . . the Gospel of Christ is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth." Christian Stewardship in its deeper meaning will give us a new sense of values. For it is more than giving our money, it is the full consecration of ourselves to God. From the teaching of the Scripture it is clear that Bible stewardship means at least three things: (1) The acknowledgement of God's ownership of all things; (2) The acceptance of what we are and have as a trust from God; (3) The administration of the same according to the will of God.

"Where there is no vision the people perish." We believe there is need in our churches for a new vision, that will bring a deeper consecration, of our time, our talents, and our material blessings to God. (1) We need, like Isaiah, to see the Lord high and lifted up. (2) We need to see ourselves and our need. (3) We need to see the millions at home and abroad, who have never yet been reached with the Gospel

of Jesus Christ. And then say, like Isaiah, "Here am I, Lord, send me."

Your stewardship committee met in Fuquay Springs last spring, with every member present. It was decided at this meeting to show a stewardship film, and present a stewardship program in some centrally located churches, inviting people from other churches to attend. Two such programs were given. In addition to the film, "God Is My Land Lord," Brothers Glendon Johnson and T. N. Daughtry gave interesting talks at these meetings. Brother Johnson spoke of the work at Wake Chapel and Brother Daughtry told of the Lord's Acre Plan used at Amelia. Eleven churches were represented at these meetings.

We heartily endorse Brother Fred P. Register as our first full-time Secretary of Stewardship and Evangelism in the Southern Convention. We recommend that the stewardship committee and churches of our conference work in full cooperation with

him.

EXHIBIT 3 REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM

Evangelism is our supreme duty as a church and as Christians. It is the heart of the Gospel of Christ. There is a great call and need for winning the lost to Christ. All about us is a world in distress, and Christ is the only hope of it. It is our supreme duty and privilege to preach and present Him as the only inexhaustible source of Divine help and wisdom. Jesus came to seek and to save that which is lost. If the lost is saved He must have the help of His followers. No greater honor can come to any one than to be in a group of people who are seeking to build a better world. We believe the Church is faced or confronted with the greatest opportunity in her history. As we live in this age of transition, this atomic and hydrogen age, faced with a dimly discerned future, will the Church be big enough and courageous enough to give a decisive leadership so much needed in the spiritual affairs of the world? Let us earnestly pray the Lord of the harvest to send forth laborers into the fields already white unto harvest. Also pray, "O Lord, revive thy work in the midst of the years, in the midst of the years make known, in wrath remember mercy."

Therefore we wish to make the following recommendations:

- That we urge our people to pray earnestly for a pentecostal revival during the coming year, remembering that a period of prayer preceded Pentecost.
- That we place greater emphasis on church attendance, setting as our goal 75 per cent or our residental membership.
- 3. That we seek to re-enlist inactive church members.
- 4. That we seek to increase our Sunday School attendance and urge the teachers to place greater emphasis o nevangelism and church loyalty.
- 5. That we urge our people to do more personal visitation and evangelism.
- That wherever possible a strong Laymen's Fellowship be organized and encouraged to do evangelistic work.

EXHIBIT 4

COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS

The Mission Board of the Southern Convention during the past year has given financial assistance to four projects within the boundaries of our conference; Fayetteville, \$4,696; Chapel Hill, \$400 (student work); Bethlehem, \$100 (building aid); and Southern Pines, \$500 (building aid).

Your committee wishes to especially commend the work done by the Eutaw Community Church (Fayetteville) under the excellent leadership of the Reverend Carl Wallace.

This committee also would like to call attention to the problems of relating the "sense of mission" of the Christian man or woman to the whole enterprise of the Christian movement rather than restricting it to a specialized group of activities known as "missions." This becomes increasingly important as the work of missions is more and more a part of the whole range of the Church's interests rather than being limited to a segregated type of program known as missionary work.

We further believe that since there is "One Mission" of the church, that this conference should have one committee concerned with all missionary aspects of our church's life.

Recommendation: That the conference committee on Home Missions be merged with the committee of Foreign Missions (and with the C. M. A. if they approve) to form the Conference Committee on Missions.

EXHIBIT 5

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

The Foreign Missions Committee of the Eastern North Carolina Conference met one time during the year. This meeting was held at the home of Reverend E. M. Carter on February 2nd. At this meeting certain recommendations for program and procedure were made. They are as follows:

1. That we attempt to secure a returned missionary in order that he might bring to the people of our local churches a first hand report concerning the work in the mission field.

Action has already been taken on this recommendation. Dr. Edward Wilder, a returned medical missionary from India, has been secured. He will be with us here in the Eastern North Carolina Conference during the period November 3rd-23rd. Dr. Wilder has worked in India since 1921. The churches of our Conference are urged to give him their whole-hearted support. If he isn't appearing in your church, make plans to attend the church nearest you where he is appearing.

2. That each church accept as a minimum the payment of its Conference Apportionment for Missions.

Since we live in an economy in which practically everything is tied up in "dollarsand-cents," it is imperative that we realize our obligation as Christian men and women where this matter is concerned.

3. That each church present at least one good mission film during the coming

"One picture is worth a thousand words" says an old Chinese proverb. Few would doubt the wisdom and truth of this saying. Realizing that a film is more effective than the reading of a book or the preaching of a sermon, let us endeavour to bring to our people the knowledge and inspiration that is to be gained through the showing of good mission films. The Women's Organizations in our churches are especially urged to participate in the showing of either "The City Story" or "The Beginning."

4. That the Conference Committee on Foreign Missions and the Conference Committee on Home Missions be merged to form the Conference Committee on Missions.

We live in a world in which a distinct line can no longer be drawn between "Foreign" and "Home" missions. Not only has modern transportation reduced our world in time and allowed us to become citizens of that world, but our increased awareness of our relationship with Christians regardless of their race or nationality brings us face to face with the fact that our responsibility is not to "Home" and "Foreign" missions distinct and apart from one another, but our responsibility is to a Christian World Mission.

EXHIBIT 6

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Protestant movement away from the Roman Catholic Church in the sixteenth century left one area of religious life dangerously exposed—education. Whereas the Old Church had an continued to train her members through parochial schools, the new movement soon led in other directions. Robert Raikes brought back into focus this neglected area when he started the Sunday School movement in 1780 in England. Our Sunday Schools continue today but are they filling this exposed area? Many critics today are saying that our Sunday Schools are just a thin veneering over an otherwise vacant spot in our religious life. James Smart in his new book, The Teaching Ministry of the Church, points ont that we are rearing a generation of Christians who do not know what nor why they believe as they do. The often used expression, "Sunday School Stuff," for all that is trite and meaningless seems appropriate. Discerning Christians are faced with the truth—whether we continue our Sunday Schools in the same irrelevant manner and satisfy ourselves with children ignorant of their faith or we determine to put some meaning into our program of Christian Education.

A program of Christian Education to be meaningful will be designed so as to synchronize the Sunday School with the total program of the Church, and above all will include the home. At best the Sunday School has the child the equivalent of three school days a year. Thus, a total educating atmosphere must be established by church and home cooperating together. Any program short of this total atmosphere will result in the problem we are trying to fight through. As to content, we must rethink our Bible and be honest and open in our conclusions. The "Book of Books" must be made relevant for life today. The time for "fear of offense" must give way to our Lord's commission to win the lost. Christian Education has and continues to play a vital role in the salvation of men

Locally in our E. N. C. Conference this past year we conducted a well-attended Superintendent's Meeting at Wake Chapel Church in January. In July our annual Sunday School Convention was held at Oak Level Church. The program at each of these meetings was designed to awaken Sunday School leaders to the important task of Christian Education.

In consideration of the above report this committee makes the following recommendations:

- 1. That the churches of our Conference discreetly observe the weeks of the year designated for Religious Education emphasis,
- 2. That each Sunday School or Church organize a Worker's Council for the purpose of making their program of Christian Education more effective.
- 3. That Advance and The Christian Sun be subscribed to by at least one Sunday School leader for the purpose of using pertinent material in the educational program.
- 4. That a library be established in every church in our conference.

5. That a continuous emphasis be placed on Elon College as our church related school.

- 5. That G. Julius Rice's Conference Ordination be continued.
- 6. That the standing of W. L. Wood, Box 55, Long Eddy, N. Y., who has retired from the active pastorate, be continued here.
- 7. That Gil Marsh be continued as a Candidate for the Ministry in the Biblical Class.
- 8. That the standing of Fred P. Register, who will labour as a member of the Staff of the Southern Convention be continued here.
- 9. That when the Rev. R. Eugene Tally presents a letter of transfer from the Eastern Virginia Conference, he be duly received as a minister in full standing in this conference.
- 10. That Billy Joe Willett and James Hatch, high school students be continued under the care of Conference as prospective candidates for the ministry.

RESOLUTION REGARDING ELON COLLEGE CAMPAIGN

Whereas the Southern Convention has previously authorized the raising of the Two and One-Half Million Dollar Fund for Elon College and

Whereas the task of raising this fund has not been completed, and

Whereas the ministers of the Southern Convention at a meeting in Henderson, North Carolina, on January 5, 1954, approved the campaign and voted unanimously to undertake to raise in the churches of the Southern Convention the sum of \$300,-000—\$150,000 from the churches in Virginia as part payment on Virginia Hall, a dormitory for girls, and \$150,000 from the churches in North Carolina as part payment on Carolina Hall, a dormitory for boys, therefore

Be it resolved, that the Eastern North Carolina Conference accept the recommendation of our ministers and authorize the Executive Committee of the Eastern North Carolina Conference, in cooperation with the Superintendent of the Southern Convention and officials of the College, to proceed with plans and a campaign to secure its pro-rata share of the \$150,000 for Carolina Hall, a dormitory for boys, and issue a challenge to the Western and North Carolina and Virginia Conferences to cooperate in the securing of \$150,000 for Carolina Hall.

We compliment the Church on the splendid reconstruction of their Sanctuary and facilities, and rejoice in this privilege or returning after 20 years for this session of the Conference; and we pray God's blessing upon their continued ministry to this community.
- 2. We express our gratitude to those who prepared the program of the Conference; to the officers of the Conference, and the Committees, for the setting forth of our common task; and to Mrs. L. C. Neville, of Chapel Hill, who typed the reports gratis, and made the mimeographed copies available.
- 3. To all those who have presented the challenging reports and messages, especially our guests and visitors from afar, Dr. Sidney M. Berry, of London, and Dr. Edward W. Wilder, of India, and our leaders from other Conferences, we offer our grateful appreciation.
- 4. That we, as a Conference, join heartily in the proposed "Centennial Observance" of the Southern Convention, incorporating as far as possible all the objectives of the Program of Advance in our local churches.
- 5. That we join with the State and Nation in expressing our deep regret at the untimely death of Governor Umstead, remembering his contribution to the cause of Christian citizenship and Christian standards; and that the Secretary be instructed to communicate this expression of our sympathy to the family of Governor Umstead.

- 6. That we, as a Conference, call upon our people to study with care and prayer the voted resolution of our General Council regarding the difficult problem of non-segregation; and that we reffirm the historic principle (Number 4) of the "Christian Church" (as given on page 16 in the Manual of the Southern Convention) namely, "Christian character is a sufficient test of fellowship, and of Church membership." That our Social Action Committee, in cooperation with the Churches, carry forward such studies and activities as may develop better understanding of and support for the Christian ideal, and the implementation of the Supreme Court decisions.
- 7. We rejoice in the provision of the Convention of the newly appointed Director of Stewardship and Evangelism, the Rev. Fred P. Register; and the Rev. John S. Graves as Director of Christian Education and Youth Work; and that we pledge to them our hearty support; that we endeavor, especially, the strengthening and growth of our Clurches through comprehensive and aggressive programs of evangelism, education and stewardship.
- 8. That we pledge our support to the Executive Committee of our General Council in the recently sought renewal of effort toward the merger of our Congregational Christian Churches and the Evangelical and Reformed Church.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee of the Conference met three times during the year ending, October 31, 1954.

On April 23, 1954, the Board met in Sanford. It was voted to omit the Spring Conference Session this year because of an overcrowded schedule, postponing it to the Spring of 1955. MOTIONS PASSED BY CONFERENCE

Voted:

1. To adopt the following resolution concerning Elon College:

RESOLUTION

Whereas the Southern Convention has previously authorized the raising of the Two and One-Half Million Dollar Fund for Elon College, and

Whereas the task of raising this fund has not been completed, and

Whereas the ministers of the Southern Convention at a meeting in Henderson, North Carolina, on January 5, 1954, approved the campaign and voted unanimously to undertake to raise in the churches of the Southern Convention the sum of \$300,000.00—\$150,000.00 from the churches in Virginia as part payment on Virginia Hall, a dormitory for girls, and \$150,000.00 from the churches in North Carolina as part payment on Carolina Hall, a dormitory for boys, therefore

Be It Resolved: That the Western North Carolina Conference accept the recommendation of our ministers and authorize the Executive Committee of the Western North Carolina Conference, in cooperation with the Superintendent of the Southern Convention and officials of the College, to proceed with plans and a campaign to secure its pro-rata share of the \$150,000.00 for Carolina Hall, a dormitory for boys, and issue a challenge to the North Carolina and Virginia Conference to cooperate in the securing of \$150,000.00 for Carolina Hall.

- 2. To accept the new Apportionments as goals toward which to work. If a church cannot pay its apportionments in full, then it is asked to pay on each item about in proportion.
- 3. To give a Bible to each person when ordained. The chairman of the Committee on the Ministry is to secure the book for presentation.
- 4. To hold a one-day session in the spring, primarily for education and inspiration, and a one-day session in the fall, primarily for business.
- 5. To hold the spring session at Asheboro, date to be set by the Executive Committee. Time and place of the fall session to be arranged by the Executive Committee.
- 6. To cooperate with the Southern Convention in its "Centennial Program of Advance" during the 1954-56 biennium.
- 7. That the secretary be authorized to complete the minutes and have them printed in The Annual.
- 8. That the Conference purchase 200 copies of The Annual; that copies be sent to the ministers and Conference officials, and that the remainder be prorated to the churches.

REPORTS RECEIVED BY CONFERENCE

Reports to Conference given below are in alphabetical order for ease in finding, rather than in the order of adoption:

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Jesus is the central personality of the Bible. The Old Testament gives the story of the preparation for His coming. The New Testament tells us of His life, His teaching, and His death and resurrection. It also gives the interpetation of Him by those who lived in His day and came under His teachings and influence. It tells the story of the founding of the Christian church to carry on the work of Jesus. It is the purpose of the church today to teach Jesus and His way of life in every phase. We preach and teach so that persons of all ages may come into right relationship with God and continue in that relationship.

Christian education is a means by which the church proclaims the Gospel of Jesus Christ. It is a means whereby children, young people, and adults are instructed to the Kingdom of God. It is through Christian education in our homes, in our churches, and in our schools that we discover the true love of God.

How are we to know if our Christian education program is adequate for our church? How can we know our weaknesses and strengths and plan for improvement? The following points is a standard recommended by the Division of Christian Education by which we may check our program:

- 1. The church provides educational activities for persons of all ages. In addition to the work of the Sunday school, there will be youth groups, young adult groups, and a variety of adult activities.
- 2. The church plans a comprehensive and unified program for the church. A program that is based upon a body of curriculum materials which truly interpret the faith and mission of the church.
- 3. The church makes it clear to the adult members that the educational program is a church-and-home plan, and gives as much attention to the family aspect as it does to the activities of Sunday morning.
- The church selects its teachers and leaders carefully, holds workers conferences, and encourages attendance at leadership schools.
- 5. The church recognizes that worship is central in the life of the church and in Christian experience and plans its worship periods as carefully as it does its study program.
- The church makes effort to reach the unreached in the community and to bring them into the fellowship of the church.
- The church provides adequate equipment so that each group may do good work.
- 8. The church plans special summer activities which make these months a time of growth and preparation for the rest of the year. This should include Bible school, camps for children and young people, conferences to meet with other people.

How does your church stand according to this standard? Does it meet the requirements of a well-rounded program? It is the hope of this committee that this year all our churches will strive to meet these requirements.

CHURCH BUILDING LOAN FUND

The Church Building Loan Fund campaign is not over in our Conference, because we have not completed our job.

It had been our hope that the churches would have pledged the \$11,500 voted by this Conference as its quota. But, so far as we know, thirteen churches have signed Declarations amounting to \$5,100, which leaves a balance of \$6,400 for the other churches.

It is hoped that payments will begin this year, and continue annually until paid in full.

It is very important for us to do our full share because:

- 1. It is our first chance to help in this matter;
- 2. We have received generously from the funds which we did not give;
- 3. We need to call for aid from this source, and will be in need for years to come as we grow.

Hence your committee recommends that Conference again request all the churches to share in this important matter.

ELON COLLEGE SUSTAINING FUND

In recent years the Southern Convention has asked the churches to give to Elon College annually one dollar per member as a Sustaining Fund. This has been in addition to the small Apportionment for the college. Small? Well, it has averaged about 27 cents per member annually, or one half cent per week. That surely could not be called LARGE.

Now the Convention is asking the churches to increase the Apportionment giving, and to discontinue the Sustaining Fund.

This is the way it works. The past year this Conference was asked for \$1,140 through Apportionments, and \$4,169 through the Sustaining Fund, or a total of \$5,-309. For the coming year we are asked to give \$2,660 through Apportionments and none through the Sustaining Fund. This is a decrease in total askings for the college of \$2,649, or almost one-half. From our point of view, that sounds like a bargain.

But we must remember that Elon College needs enough money so it can function properly. More people are seeking a college education than ever before. Costs continually rise. We must not expect others to carry this important phase of our Church work for us. Each must do his share. This is the only way that we can feel honest and honorable. If we try real hard, each member should be able to contribute his sixty-six cents to Elon College during the coming year.

People need college training. Without it one cannot be his best in a world like ours. This education needs Christian content given by those who display Christian character. This the State cannot guarantee, but the Church can. Here is still to be found the argument for the Christian college. It opens to each of us an opportunity to have a share in shaping the destiny of our nation, and our world, by helping to train properly those who are to be our leaders. Count it a privilege, therefore, to share in the support of Elon College, a college owned and operated by Christians in North Carolina and Virginia, a college with excellent history, a successful present, and a future limited only by the Christian devotion of us, the members of Congregational Christian Churches.

EVANGELISM

The evangelistic function of our Church has been its life blood from the very beginning. Our Lord and Saviour gave the foundation in His command, "Go into all the world and preach the gospel." The early leaders of the church accepted the command, and they "went everywhere preaching the word."

Our Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Fellowship is challenged to place special emphasis on Evangelism for the next biennium. The following goal is suggested:

- 1. At least one new member per month per 100 members of the church 'That this effort be made through:
 - A. Sunday School.
 - B. Personal Evangelism.
 - C. Preaching Mission, or season of Revival services.
 - D. Pastor's Class.

2. That the period beginning with Lent be set aside for the special emphasis. In the recent meeting of the committees from the Southern Convention we reaffirmed the reason for evangelistic efforts on the part of the Christian—here it is:

"I believe Jesus lived and died for me and for all mankind, a free gift from God, that I and every other person might have Eternal life here and throughout all Eternity. In loving recognition of this gift from God to me, I am impelled to bear my witness of that love and gift; by word, deed, and life. By cooperative action with my brethren, who likewise recognize God's love, and supreme Gift. I shall with them seek to find and use the best methods possible to bring others in acceptance and recognition of this love and gift."

We welcome the Rev. Fred Register into our fellowship to help us in the great task of Stewardship and Evangelism. We pledge to him and to God our loyal support

in this great undertaking.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

In keeping with the vote of Conference to raise \$11,500 for the Building Loan Fund of the denomination, the Executive Committee signed a Declaration of Purpose for the Conference to complete this amount.

On recommendation of the Committee on the Ministry, Curtis Medlin, a member of Grace's Chapel and a student at Elon College, was admitted to the Biblical Class.

We have noted with interest the successful work of many of our churches through the year. More of them are claiming full time of a minister. This is what we had all hoped. But we regret that this growth, together with the loss of some of our ministers, means that several churches are finding it difficult to secure adequate pastoral service for the coming year. Your committee stands ready to render every possible service to the churches in this, or any other phase of our work.

- 1. That all pastors secure the literature that is available from the Mission Board and see that it is placed where all members can find it and read it.
- 2. That special emphasis be given to the teaching of missions during the Mission Period and that all people of the church be given a chance to contribute to missions during that period.
- 3. That we make use of the speakers from the mission field when they are available to speak in our churches.
- 4. That we seek to find those who might be called to do mission work, and if they be found within our church, then aid them in any way that we can.

Therefore, it is recommended:

- 1. That we be constantly in prayer for our churches.
- 2. That we contribute financially to this worthy cause.
- 3. That we work together in building new churches and improving old ones.
- 4. That no church be without a pastor for any length of time, if it is at all possible to secure one.
- 5. That all churches pay their apportionments in full.
- 6. That all churches cooperate with the Church Building Loan Fund program.

LAYMEN'S FELLOWSHIP

The Laymen's Fellowship of the Western North Carolina Conference has had a very successful year, with a great deal of interest and enthusiasm shown in our meetings.

Any of the officers will be glad to visit a group wishing help in organizing a Laymen's Fellowship in their church.

MINISTERIAL AND CHURCH RELATIONS

The Church is much greater and far more powerful than many people realize. Too many think of it as a matter-of-fact, that it probably is a good thing, and that it is my privilege to take it or leave it. They do not realize that it is the "leaven" that influences the whole society of human relationship, and that it is the "light of the world" and the "salt of the earth."

According to statistics, there is now a greater percent of American people identified with the Church than ever has been, also greater and better church buildings than ever before. But all Christian people realize that the Church is not the spiritual force and power that it should be. What can be done about it, and who shall do it? The answer is, YOU and I can do the job through cooperation.

The Church is made up of ministers and laymen, and there is a vital relationship between the two groups.

1. The minister should take his work seriously. He should "study to show himself a workman approved unto God." He is the chosen leader of the church and should be planning and praying daily that God's will might be worked out in his life.

- 2. The church should see to it that his financial needs are taken care of by paying him a sufficient salary as promptly as they expect their own salaries.
- 3. The minister and church should plan together the program of the church and take it seriously, and strive to make every church in this Conference a soul-winning church.
- 4. When a minister is chosen, or called, to be pastor of a church, the pulpit is his while he is pastor, and he should be faithful to the trust, and very careful how it is used. He should consult the church before he invites an evangelist to hold his revival. The church pays the bill and should have a right to say who shall be invited.
- 5. The church should not invite any person to fill the pulpit on any occasion without the consent of the pastor.
- 6. No minister should accept an invitation to officiate at a wedding in another pastor's church without an invitation by the pastor, though he may be a former pastor and dearly loved by the families of those getting married; the fee then should go to the pastor.

- Gene Thomas, a member of the Biblical Class, is in his senior year at Elon College. He is serving the church at Ramseur and has a letter from the church recommending his licensure. It is recommended that he be licensed at this session of Conference.
- Rev. Raymond T. Grissom has moved to the Eastern Virginia Conference and will serve Holy Neck as pastor. He asks for a transfer of membership to that Conference. It is recommended that this transfer be granted.

The Christian Sun has a new offer now, and this is something you should know about. If one-half of the families in your church will subscribe to The Sun, you can get it for \$2.00 per year instead of the regular price of \$3.00. Why not get your church to do this?

Each year we remind you to work out a system whereby you can have a certain time each day for Bible reading and prayer. We do not feel that our people are doing this like we have advised, so we again remind you that God speaks to his people through the reading of his Word and through prayer. We pray for guidance from God, but are not willing to read the Bible and receive his guidance. Let us again urge you to read daily the Book which is sufficient for guidance.

And, last, we have a new Manual which contains the rules and by-laws of the Convention. This should be read by every member of our churches, in order that we may know who we are, what we believe, and how to carry on the business of our churches. Why don't you ask your pastor to secure one for you?

We all know that we forget the things that we do not re-read and study. So choose the best literature and study hard in order that you may not forget to be at your best for the Master.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION

The growth of our Sunday schools in this Conference has been encouraging this year. Most all of our churches have reported gains in attendance, better organization,

About a hundred teachers, superintendents, and interested persons attended the three night sessions of this school, meeting at Pleasant Ridge. Miss Ione Catton, one of our national workers, taught the class for teachers. Rev. Fred Register, of Wake Chapel church, led the superintendents in their classes.

Thirty Sunday school officers attended the Superintendents' Meeting at the Ramseur Town Hall, April 3, 1954. Dr. L. E. Smith, president of Elon College, was a guest at the meeting. Dean J. Earl Danieley, of Elon College, was the speaker of

the evening.

Needham's Grove was the scene of the Convention's meeting on July 13 of this year. Twenty-seven churches were represented; three additional reports were received by the secretary. This is one of the largest percentages of churches reporting that we have on record. We hope that each of our churches in the Conference will report this year. Dr. W. E. Wisseman, of the First Church, Greensboro, delivered the keynote address, "The Place of the Sunday School in the Church."

The two awards which I, as president of the Convention, presented were won by Shady Grove and Providence Chapel. Each church received a copy of the book, "Christ and the Fine Arts," for their high attendance percentages throughout the year. Needham's Grove, the host church, won the attendance banner for the largest

percentage of its members present at the Convention.

Since the Convention met in July, there has been a Sunday school reorganized at Center Grove, near Pittsboro. Your president has assisted them in their organization, with the cooperation of Rev. Walter Trotter, who is supply-pastor of the church.

While serving as your president, it has been my privilege to visit 18 of the Sun-

day schools of our Convention, traveling 519 miles.

cooperate in the Church Building Loan Fund Campaign.

4. Our Bailey's Grove Church is planning a new building in the near future. We commend this small congregation for this forward step. A new building is needed in this rapidly growing community. We recommend that the churches of the Conference make a special offering sometime during the year to help with this new building. Money should be sent to the Conference treasurer, designated for Bailey's Grove building program.

The one hundred twenty-ninth annual session of the North Carolina nd Virginia Conference of Congregational Christian Churches met with First Congregational Christian Church, Greensboro, North Carolina, n Tuesday, November 16, 1954.

Dr. Sydney M. Berry, secretary of the International Congregational Council, London, England, addressed the Conference, bringing greetings of the Council and of the Congregational Churches around the world.

The Conference recessed for a meeting of the Conference Missionary Association.

TUESDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

Conference reconvened at 2:00 p.m., with the singing of a hymn. The opening prayer was led by C. F. Allred.

Jesse H. Dollar, president of the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, addressed the Conference on "Our Centennial Program of Advance." He presented the program as outlined by the Committee on Centennial Observance of the Southern Convention. The Conference approved and adopted this plan as the basis of work for the next two years.

The report of the Committee on Missions was presented (Exhibit 5). The report was accepted and made part of the Conference record.

L. E. Smith, president of Elon College, gave a report of the work of Elon College. (Exhibit 6.)

This report was received and the resolution was adopted. W. J. Andes spoke of his impressions as a newcomer to the Elon College Church and its work at Elon College.

- J. G. Truitt, superintendent of the Christian Orphanage, presented a report on the orphanage. (Exhibit 7.) The report was received to record and the needs of the Christian Orphanage were presented by W. E. Wisseman.
- W. E. Wisseman presented H. L. Fesperman, minister of the First Evangelical and Reformed Church of Greensboro, and asked that he be seated as a deliberative member of the Conference. Mr. Fesperman was so enrolled.

The report of the North Carolina Woman's Fellowship was presented, and was received to record. (See Exhibit 8.)

The report of the Committee on Evangelism (Exhibit 9) was presented and on motion adopted.

The report of the Committee on Christian Education (Exhibit 10) was presented and on motion adopted.

The report of the Committee on Memoirs (Exhibit 11) was presented. On motion it was adopted, and J. G. Truitt led the prayer of remembrance and dedication while Conference stood in memory of Mr. Walter R. Sellars.

The report of the Committee on Social Action (Exhibit 12) was presented, and on motion was adopted.

The report of the Committee on Resolutions (Exhibit 13) was presented and adopted by a standing vote.

The report of the Committee on Time and Place was presented and adopted. (Exhibit 14.)

On motion, it was voted to deed the Piney Plains Christian Church property to the Eastern North Carolina Conference of Congregational Christian Churches, and the Executive Committee was instructed to see that this was done. (The Executive Committee signed the necessary papers that day.)

On motion, it was voted to send a memorandum to the Eastern North Carolina Conference reminding them of their vote a few years ago to transfer the property of the Mebane Church to the North Carolina and Virginia Conference.

Morton R. Kurtz presented the program of the North Carolina Council of Churches. C. R. Key presented the program of CROP.

The Committee on Nominations presented its report (Exhibit 15).

It was moved and carried that the report of the Committee on Nominations be adopted and that the secretary be instructed to cast the ballot of the Conference for the nominees. The secretary cast the ballot as directed, and the president declared the officers elcted.

The report of the Committee on Finance was presented and adopted. (See Exhibit 16.)

The report of the North Carolina and Virginia Pilgrim Fellowship was presented, and was received to record (Exhibit 17).

It was moved and carried that the Conference have its official minutes printed in The Annual; and that the Conference purchase two hundred copies of The Annual for pro-rata distribution among the churches.

The Committee on the Bequest of Miss M. Joanna Jones reported (Exhibit 18). The report of the committee was adopted.

By motion, the president and the secretary were authorized to complete the minutes of this Conference.

By motion, the Conference would stand adjourned, following the evening service, to meet at the First Congregational Christian Church, Burlington, N. C., on a date arranged by the Evecutive Committee.

- 5. The right of private judgment and the liberty of conscience is a right and privilege that should be accorded to, and exercised by all.
- 6. The union of all the followers of Christ, to the end that the world may believe.

We subscribe to the Cardinal Principles and Government of the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, and being desirous of associating ourselves in Christ with the North Carolina and Virginia Conference of the Southern Convention, we agree to submit ourselves to the Brethren in the Lord, and to be governed by the Principles and Government of the Congregational Christian Churches of the Southern Convention.

We hereby associate ourselves as Charter Members of the Congregational Christian Church, South Boston, Virginia; we invite other persons to join us in this Christian enterprise either by Confession of Faith in Jesus Christ, Reaffirmation of Faith, or by Letter of Transfer from some other evangelical Church; and we hereby request membership in the North Carolina and Virginia Conference.

Done this the Seventeenth Day of January, in the year of our Lord Nine teen Hundred and Fifty-Four, County of Halifax, State of Virginia.

Your Executive Committee, on recommendation of the Committee on the Ministry, voted to revoke and cancel the ministerial license of Fred H. Wrenn and his name was dropped from the Conference Roll.

It was voted to approve the recommendation of the Committee on the Ministry that on each Certificate of Licensure the Conference secretary should write: "This license is for one year only."

Rev. G. C. Crutchfield was appointed to the Committee on the Ministry, succeeding Rev. H. P. Bozarth who had resigned.

We, your Committee, feel that the time has come for a redistricting of churches in North Carolina into Conferences. Smaller associations of churches might be helpful. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE MINISTRY

The securing of pastors for the churches of the Southern Convention is still one of the crucial issues to be faced. There are not enough of our able young men dedicating their lives to service as ministers. We recommended that this Conference memorialize the Convention Committee on the Ministry to plan and initiate a campaign of Enlistment which will carry the challenge of the Christian ministry to the young men of all our churches,

We recommend that Rev. Walter Hall, pastor of Third Avenue Christian Church, Danville, Virginia, be received and enrolled as a member of the Conference, coming by transfer from Woburn Association, Mass.

The Reverend David W. Shepherd has accepted the pastorate of the Union and Hebron Churches, Halifax County, Virginia. The Congregational Christian Conference of Georgia has granted him a letter of transfer to this Conference. We recommend that he be received and so enrolled.

The Reverend Howard P. Bozarth requests a letter of transfer to the Yankton Association of Congregational Churches of South Dakota. We recommend that the transfer be granted.

Garland B. Bennett, who was enrolled as a member of the Biblical Class at the last session of Conference, continues his studies at Elon College. We recommend that he be continued as a member of the Biblical Class.

J. Robert Bennett applies for membership in the Biblical Class. He is a special student at Elon College, and is recommended by the Palm Street Church of which he is a member, as a suitable candidate for the ministry. We recommend that he be enrolled in the Biblical Class.

John Littiken, a member of the Biblical Class from the Eastern N. C. Conference, has been granted a letter of transfer to this Conference. He is now pastor of Hines Chapel and Monticello Churches, which recommended him for licensure. He meets the requirements for licensure and passed a satisfactory examination. We recommend that he be licensed at this session of Conference.

Fred Harold Wrenn, who was licensed at the last session of Conference, appeared before the committee, returned his license, and requested that his license be cancelled. We recommend that his license be cancelled.

George M. Phillips, a member of the Hopedale Church and a student at Elon College, is recommended by his church as a suitable candidate for the ministry. We

recommend that he be enrolled as a member of the Biblical Class.

The Reverend Beverly Cosby and the Reverend Irving Stubbs, co-ministers of the Church of the Covenant, Lynchburg, Virginia, and members of the New York Association of Congregational Christian Churches, presented letters of transfer from the N. Y. Association to this Conference. We recommend that they be received and enrolled as ministers of this Conference.

Clifton Walker, a member of the Biblical Class, is now a Junior in Trinity College, Duke University. He appeared before your committee and requested licensure. The Durham Church of which he is a member recommends him as a suitable candidate for the ministry. After due examination we recommend that he be licensed at this session of Conference.

Licentiate Timothy S. Chang continues his graduate study at the University of Ohio. We recommend that he be continued as a licentiate.

Licentiate Warren A. Matthews is a student at Hartford Seminary. We recommend that he be continued as a licentiate.

Curtis Young, a member of the Biblical Class, is a student at Elon College. We recommend that he be continued as a member of the Biblical Class.

C. C. Mulholland III, a member of the Biblical Class, is a student at Trinity College, Duke University. We recommend that he be continued as a member of the Biblical Class.

We recommend that Rev. I. T. Underwood be continued as a licentiate.

We recommend that Rev. W. T. Waller, Jr., be continued as a licentiate.

We recommend that Rev. Herman L. Johnson be continued as a licentiate.

Mr. Howland Shepherd of the Gibsonville Church was received as a member of the Biblical Class after the last session of Conference. We recommend he be continued as a member of the Biblical Class.

We recommend that the Conference Ordination of Rev. J. Lester Stanley and Rev. Harold Loman be continued.

Sammy D. Nelson who was recommended for licensure at the last session of Conference, but was unable to be present at the last session, has requested a transfer of his standing as a member of the Biblical Class to the Eastern Virginia Conference. We recommend that the transfer be granted.

Rev. Wm. T. Scott, Jr., has accepted the pastorate of the Durham Church. The Litchfield North Connecticut Association has granted a transfer of his ministerial standing to this Conference. We recommend that he be received and enrolled as an elder of this Conference.

Rev. Guy H. Veazey has accepted the pastorate of the Lakeview Church and is moving to Elon. He has requested a transfer from the Western N. C. Conference to this Conference. We recommend that upon the receipt of his transfer he be received as a member of this Conference.

We recommend that when unordained students are serving as pastors of churches, the Convention Superintendent, and the chairman of the Committee on the Ministry be authorized to arrange for a nearby ordained pastor to serve as advisor to the church and the student pastor; that the student pastor make a report to his advisor each month and confer with him when student pastor or advisor deems it necessary; and that the church report to the advisor quarterly as to how the pastoral arrangement is working.

EXHIBIT 5 REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS

We rejoice with the pastor and people of our new church at South Boston, Va. This church, Center Congregational Christian, was organized just this past Conference year and since that time these people have purchased a lovely building site and erected the first unit of their Building Program. This beautiful new building is now in use.

Beverly Hills Church in Burlington is still growing by leaps and bounds. These people are well on their way toward completing the first permanent unit of their building program. Lakeview and Zion churches of near Burlington are doing a real service in their respective communities. We should give to these churches our encouragement at every opportunity. By following the progress of these churches and sharing in their experiences maybe we of the "older churches" may catch their spirit of faith and enthusiasm. By supporting the Church Building Loan Fund Campaign in our local churches we not only help these churches of our own Conference, but other churches all over the nation as well. Encourage your church to put its quota toward this Fund. We experience the abundant life only as we help to give new life to others. Our present churches must give birth to new churches or our cause is lost.

We usually think of the term "missions" as meaning home and foreign missions. However, are we not now approaching the day when we should look at the task of the church as a mission and not missions? The average layman today is so confused and disheartened at the useless overlapping of our effort under different names and different heads that he doesn't know whether he is coming or going. We can no longer think in terms of home and foreign missions. For in the world of Christian fellowship there are no foreigners. The meeting of the World Council of Churches last August at Evanston, Ill., is proof enough that geographical boundries no longer make us different people. We may still have differences as to tradition, custom and even ecclesiastical procedure, but the bond of Christian fellowship is one and the same all over the world.

The Christian Church is a mission. We speak of home and foreign missions, evangelism, social action, stewardship as if they were segregated issues within them-

selves. That is not true. Our mission is one! Andrew Vance McCraken in an article entitled "Mission-Not Missions," in the November first issue of Advance made this statement: "I am thoroughly convinced that if and when we, as a Congregational Christian fellowship, begin to think of ourselves—clearly and with determination—as being involved each and all in a simple mission, in a dynamic encounter with the world as a whole, in a witnessing ministry to the totality of mankind, our secondary interests and concerns will take care of themselves in due order."

Now such a change in philosophy or practice cannot be brought about over night. But our churches need to be looking in this direction if we are to meet the world-wide demands now being made upon us. Ours is a Christian mission including every phase and precept of Christ's teachings. God is marching on but we cannot follow Him divided and confused. Let us confront the world with a single united endeavor, with a spiritual challenge based on the everlasting promise of God revealed

to us through the good news of Jesus Christ!

Ехнівіт 6 ELON COLLEGE REPORTS

There are certain items of interest at the College that I am sure our church, the alumni, and friends will find of interest.

The Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.—This association as you know, is the accrediting agency for the colleges and secondary schools located in the southeast. Elon College, on account of a series of unfortunate situations, lost its membership in the association in November, 1931. By presistent and determined efforts, supported at all times by the church in the Southern Convention, the College regained its membership in the Association in November, 1944. This, of course, meant that the College had improved preceptibly along all lines and that the debts so long standing had been settled and now the institution is ready to move forward.

All member colleges are required to report annually to the association. members must make a fuller report every three years. The individual institution is scrutinized more carefully in these triennial reports. Every ten years, the association sends a special committee to the college campus to make a thorough investigation of the entire campus-buildings, grounds, faculty, students, library, equipment, business, records, and all transactions of the entire institution. This inspection is to determine if and how the College is meeting all the twenty-one standards that are expected to be met.

The Assocation made this inspection of Elon Coilege on October 11-13, 1954. The report that goes to the association at its annual meeting states that Elon College is meeting all standards satisfactorily. The following is a brief summary attached to the report by the committee:

"The Committee is deeply appreciative of the many courtesies extended by the president of the institution and his colleagues. The administration, faculty, and students showed a spirit of cordial cooperation.

"The high degree of excellence which marked the preparation of the preliminary reports provided the committee greatly facilitated the progress of the study.

"Every assistance was given the committee. There was at all times free and frank discussion and the committee was impressed with the fact that the administration, the faculty, and the students were alert to opportunities looking toward the further development of the Institution.

"It is the judgment of the committee that the personnel, policies and practices of this institution are progressive and dedicated to the further strengthening of the institution.

"The Committee believes that (except as noted) the standards are being well met, and is confident that the institution will continue to make every effort toward continued growth and development."

You will note that this is not a hearsay, a supposition, or opinions, but facts put down in black and white by a committee whose business it is to investigate, determine the facts and report to the accrediting association.

Proposed Loan—\$675,000.00.—This Loan was authorized by the Board of Trustees of Elon College and approved by the Southern Convention in biennial session, May, The College Administration was successful in getting the application approved by the Housing and Home Finance Agency and the money set aside pending final approval of the application in detail. Just as soon as certain legal technicalities are completed and the architect's plans and specifications are ready for bids, the money will be available in such amounts as may be required by building operations. This means a long step in the right direction for our College.

The Two and One Half Million Dollar Campaign Fund .- In 1946, on recommendation of the Board of Trustees of Elon College, the Southern Convention of Conwas again increased to \$2,500,000 to be raised for the College. This money is to be raised for Elon College over a period of ten years. Later the amount to be secured was increased to \$2,000,000. At the Durham session of the Convention, the amount was again increased to \$2,500,000 to be raised for the College. This money is to be used in the erection of new buildings, securing of new equipment for loan funds to students and to add to the present endowment funds of the College.

By campaigns, personal solicitation and the strictest economy at the College, \$1,325,000 has been secured in cash and pledges. More than \$1,000,000 of this amount has been paid in cash, leaving a balance of \$1,175,000 to be secured. This is the task and responsibility facing the College, the church, alumni, and friends. The responsibility definitely concerns the conferences of the Southern Convention in annual session this year.

The plan has been suggested that the churches in Virginia, the Eastern Virginia Conference and the Valley of Virginia Conference, take the girls' dormitory, Virginia Hall, as their project and undertake to raise the necessary funds for the erection of the same and that the churches in the Carolina conferences, take the dormitory for boys, Carolina Hall, as their project and undertake to raise the necessary funds to pay for the same.

The ministers of the Convention were asked to meet at Henderson, North Carolina, on January 5, 1954, for the purpose of facing up to the Church's responsibility in securing the funds for these new dormitories proposed for the College and to consider what the ministers, through their churches, would be able to do and would do. There were thirty-eight of our ministers present. All conferences were represented. Following a days' discussion, unanimous vote was taken requesting the churches in Virginia to agree and commit themselves to secure in cash and pledges \$150,000 toward the erection of Virginia Hall, a dormitory for girls, and that the churches in North Carolina agree and commit themselves to secure \$150,000 toward the erection of Carolina Hall, a dormitory for boys, with the understanding that the College and its administration would undertake to secure sufficient funds necessary for the completion of these two and the dining room.

This vote was a voluntary vote on the part of the ministers who were present. They realized that they could not obligate their churches to any program, but that they could set goals and request a united effort in an effort to reach these goals.

The Present Status of the College.—We are now in the closing days of the first quarter of the college for 1954-55. The present enrollment is 915, the largest in the history of the school for any one quarter. Five faculty members have been added and necessary equipment purchased. The atmosphere of the campus is congenial and the college spirit is commendable.

For the past three years we have had insufficient water during the months of December and January. In an effort to obviate this inconvenience, a new well has been drilled. A test run on this well revealed a 75 gallon-per-minute capacity, which is entirely satisfactory.

With the exception of a dining room and dormitories badly needed, everything

at the College seems to be moving forward and satisfactorily.

RESOLUTION

Whereas the Southern Convention has previously authorized the raising of the Two and One-Half Million Dollar Fund for Elon College, and

Whereas the task of raising this fund has not been completed, and

Whereas the ministers of the Southern Convention, at a meeting in Henderson, North Carolina, on January 5, 1954, approved the campaign and voted unanimously to undertake to raise in the churches of the Southern Convention the sum of \$300,000—\$150,000 from the churches in Virginia as part payment on Virginia Hall, a dormitory for girls, and \$150,000 from the churches of North Carolina as part payment on Carolina Hall, a dormitory for boys, therefore

Be It Resolved:

That the North Carolina and Virginia Conference accept the recommendation of our ministers and authorize the Executive Committee of the North Carolina and Virginia Conference, in cooperation with the Superintendent of the Southern Convention and officials of the College, to proceed with plans and a campaign to secure its pro-rata share of the \$150,000 for Carolina Hall, a dormitory for boys.

This resolution has been approved by the Eastern Virginia Conference, the Eastern North Carolina Conference and the Western North Carolina Conference. The Valley of Virginia will seek approval through the proper Conference channels.

EXHIBIT 7

THE CHRISTIAN ORPHANAGE REPORT

The Christian Orphanage received its first children 47 years ago. Since then it has received 716 children. Many of them lived at the Orphanage only a few months, some of them only a few years, but a goodly number had no other home from childhood until they were 18 years of age.

At present there are 79 children at the Orphanage, but most of the year there have been 83. There are two applications being processed, and four other applications are being considered.

There are 11 employees: The superintendent, the secretary, the assistant superintendent, the dairyman, two laborers and five matrons. Of these matrons three are housemothers, one sewing matron who serves also as a supply matron when others have days off, and one kitchen matron.

There are five pre-school children and 10 in senior high school. Of these two are in the 12th grade, and two are in the 11th grade. There are 64 children in grades from the 1st through the 8th. Of these 16 are in the 1st and 2nd grades and eat their midday lunch at the cafeteria. The others return home for lunch.

The children attend Sunday school and morning worship at the Elon College Community Church. The older children attend Pilgrim Fellowship, the younger children grade into three Missionary Societies of the Elon College Community Church. The Orphanage subscribes \$400.00 to the Church budget, and also pays through the children something to Sunday school and their Missionary groups. Besides the above worship services there are many other devotional services on the Orphanage campus and frequent services in the Holt Memorial Chapel.

The children are well and happy. They are given typhoid booster shots every year. They are checked by physicians without charge, and given dental care twice each year by local dentists gratis. Relatives are kept in touch with their children and are permitted to visit them. Many friends of the children frequently visit them and help with their clothes and vacations.

The Orphanage maintains a dairy, raises hogs, sufficient beef cattle, raises chickens and supplies its own eggs. It has considerable garden produce, and this year canned over 2,000 gallons of vegetables. The farm gives opportunity for pleasant outdoor activities which the children enjoy. There is play and fun, and the athletic materials are furnished by Church groups.

Cost of maintenance of every kind has greatly increased. Clothing, food, shoes, fuel, water, lights, repairs, and wages; insurance, school fees and replacements all

the way from chairs to tractors drain the treasury. Three dry years have been a severe handicap. We shall need at least \$30,388.73 before December 31. Right now we need \$818.90 for a new deepwell pump; \$218.83 for driveway gravel; \$1,000.00 for overdue repairs and painting; \$588.00 for replacement, repairing, and new furniture; \$12,500.00 a carry-over from 1953. Only the last figure is counted in the estimated balance needed for this year of \$30,388.73.

EXHIBIT 8

REPORT ON THE NORTH CAROLINA WOMEN'S FELLOWSHIP

The North Carolina Women's Fellowship theme for 1953-54 study and work was "The Task of the Church Around the World," and the Bible Study was selected Psalms. Under the guidance of God and devoted conference and local leaders, the women's program has rendered much service.

Of the 138 churches included in the area of the N. C. Women's Fellowship, 88 churches reported active societies, enrolling at least 2,763 women. Seven new societies were organized during the year as follows: Ether, Shady Grove, South Boston, Hendersonville, Pope's Chapel, Zion, and Bethlehem. Mt. Gilead society was reorganized.

The six spring rallies were attended by 482 women, and annual conference at Southern Pines, October 5, by 376 women. 108 N. C. women attended the School of Missions at Elon College. Seventy societies had Thank Offering programs, giving a total of \$2,022.41 for Mission on Mindanao in the Philippines. Fifty-one societies sent friendly service gifts, 60 observed World Day of Prayer, 41 World Community Day, 45 May Fellowship Day, and 52 societies reported holding Bible Study. Life Memberships given totaled 45 and Memorials, 24, amounting to \$690 for Franklintonat-Bricks.

Total giving was at an all time high—\$11,389.17—an increase of \$860.92 over last year. Six societies have requested an increase in apportionment. All societies who accepted financial goals reached them.

The Women's Fellowship theme for 1954-55 is "Out of the Heart of the Gospel." Study areas are "India, Pakistan, and Ceylon" along with "The City." The book of "The Acts of the Apostles" has been chosen for Bible study.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM

A study of the reports submitted to the Annual Conference in 1953 reveals that at the beginning of last Conference Year we had a membership of 10,211; during the year we made a net increase of 425 members. This means that for each 24 members one new member was added. Of this number 322 of those who joined did so on confession of faith. This means that each 31 members won one new member to the church; at this rate, each one of us is winning one member of the Church of our Christ each 11,315 days!

Your Committee on Evangelism has not been active this year. With the exception of our individual activities, we have done nothing. This is a truth which should not be; we all recognize the need for increased emphasis on evangelism. We are encouraged that we will have in the Southern Convention a full-time worker in the field of Stewardship and Evangelism beginning December 1, 1954. We welcome him and pledge him our support as he undertakes his new work. It is our hope and our prayer that our ministers and our laity may become more concerned and consequently more active in this most important endeavor of our Church.

EXHIBIT 10 COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Board of Christian Education has encouraged Leadership Training Schools and Pilgrim Series Previews during the past year. Where they have been held it has proved to be greatly appreciated and of considerable help to teachers and superintendents.

At Camp Crabtree, near Raleigh, N. C., camps for Junior and junior high young people were conducted. Two junior camps were necessary to accommodate the large number desiring to attend. Both of these sessions were under the direction of Rev. and Mrs. Carl Wallace. One junior high camp was held under the leadership of Rev. John R. Lackey.

The Conference for young people of high school age and older was again held on the Campus of Elon College. The Conference was headed by Dean James H. Lightbourne, Jr.

Vacation Bible Schools were conducted in a great number of our churches. Materials for such schools were available through the office of the Educational Secretary. In addition to materials, some churches were given personnel through the Student Summer Service Workers.

The Student Summer Service Workers attached to work in our Conference and Convention were Misses Patsy Fuller, Patsy Tate, Betty Van Sharpe, and Martin Eichrodt. All of these students spent most of their time in camps, conferences, and Bible Schools.

The Pilgrim Fellowships of the Conference were hosts to the biennium meeting of our young people of the Southern Convention. This meeting was held for two days at the First Church of Burlington. The new officers are listed under the Pilgrim Fellowship report. A great number of church groups have taken advantage of our Conference Center, Moonelon. This has been a project of the young people and they have given their financial support.

The Board wishes to express to Miss Pattie Lee Coghill its warmest and sincerest appreciation for her tireless efforts, selfless service, and dedication to the work of this Conference. In her new work we extend our thoughts and prayers.

To Elon College the Board of Christian Education turns for a great portion of the training of our future leaders. To her we look for professional and lay leadership. We commend the personnel of the college for its fine work and for the high enrollment for the current year.

The Board recommends that if in the event the Conference has area meetings or association meetings the Educational Secretary be asked into the area for that week to work among those churches.

WALTER R. SELLARS

Mr. Walter R. Sellars was a man of rare leadership in the civic, mercantile, and religious life of Alamance County. He was one of the early pioneers of the city of Burlington, Alamance County, N. C. Mr. Sellars' business establishment grew with

the progress of the city. He was a prominent leader, deeply interested in the educational problems and progress of Alamance County. He served for a long period of years on the school board of his district, and many of the forward strides in the educational system of Alamance County were directly the results of his leadership. Mr. Sellars served the people of Alamance County, as well as the state of North Carolina, for three terms as a legislator in Raleigh, N. C. Here he demonstrated the wider interest of citizenship, always with a view to the welfare of his constituency, and the promotion of character in government.

Mr. Sellars served the First Christian Church of Burlington in the capacity of a Life Deacon, and also as a long time teacher of the Loyal Men's Bible Class, the oldest men's class of Burlington. Here, he exerted the power of a Christian witness, and the influence of high example over the lives of hundreds of men in this church and community.

As a husband and father, he placed the Lord Jesus first in the home, and was an inspiration to every other family, which had the privilege of knowing his home life. As a counsellor, he will be long cherished by the many who came for his advice and help. All who knew Mr. Sellars knew him to be a man who supported his church with his time, energy, and dollars to his highest and best ability.

The influence of Walter R. Sellars has been felt in many branches of the work of both the North Carolina and Virginia Conference of Congregational Christian Churches, and the Southern Convention, and his passing will be a loss to the leaders of the wider fellowship of our faith.

Born in Alamance County, in 1873, he departed this life September 11, 1954. His funeral service was held in the sanctuary of the church of which he had been a member since 1890. He leaves his wife, Mrs. Lila Bailey Sellars, a daughter, Elizabeth S. Farmer, and two sons, Bailey and David, all of Greensboro, N. C. Our thoughts and prayers closely attend all members of his much beloved family.

EXHIBIT 12

COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL ACTION

The objective of this committee should be and must become an application in practice as well as precept on adequate, aggressive, informative interpretation of the statement made by Christ "I am come that they might have life and that they might have it more abundantly."

The Church is the foundation of a healthy society not only in things spiritual but in its relationship to all facets of daily living.

Great issues are before all of us and the Church and her followers can not escape responsibilities, individually or collectively.

Prayerful consideration is asked of all Church bodies of the following needs, issues, and recommendations of this committee regarding these:

- Juvenile Delinguency:
 - a. An analysis of local community situations.
 - b. Conferences with young people regarding programs of activity that appeal to them.
 - c. Utilization of national youth programs that can be adapted to existing church youth activities—such as Cubbing (a program for parents for boys 8 through 10), Scouting (for boys of 11-13), and Exploring (for young men 14-18) Girl Scouting, Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A.
 - d. Relating parents to youth programs as leaders and counsellors.
 - e. Seeking guidance and counselling for church youth leaders from professional youth leaders and directors within the community.
 - f. Encourage boys in Scouting to earn the "God and Country" award which is a Church award and given only when the boy's pastor has coached, supervised, and counselled the boy through various studies of his church's history, organization, and the functions and when the boy has had spiritual experiences in practice and leadership as directed by his pastor.

- g. Co-operate with city and county wide youth programs when there is no conflict with church policies and practices.
- 2. Segregation:
 - a. This issue must be faced conscientiously with a sincere spiritual approach.
 - b. Recommended that each church unit undertake to prepare its people to accept the Supreme Court's decision, recommendations, methods-whatever they may be.
 - c. Let us as church people make our contribution to whatever the future has in store regarding this issue in a patient, Christ-like manner.
- 3. Church Committees in Social Action:
 - a. It is urged that each church unit select qualified persons to serve on such a committee.
 - (1) An analysis of the needs of a community regarding—
 - (a) Entertainment,
 - (b) Health,
 - (c) Community appearance,(d) Needs of the poor,

 - (e) Education, (f) Parental guidance, (g) Politics.

(All matters should not be approached as issues but rather as opportunities to provide in community life a better mode of living as well as a re-strengthening and re-establishing spiritual relationships.)

- 4. International Relationships:
 - a. Church individuals should be kept informed on aspects of peace and international brotherhood.
 - b. More thought should be given to the United Nations and its successors. Few people look underneath the surface of the supreme effort to bring about an understanding between men of all lands. The United Nations merit not only our prayers but strong action on the part of individuals to participate in its program in some form of contribution.
- 5. Recommendations for this committee in the future:

The North Carolina and Virginia Conference Laymen's Fellowship had three conference-wide meetings during the past year. On November 7, 1953, a meeting was held at the Monticello Church with one hundred fifteen men in attendance. Officers for a two year term were elected as follows.

Dr. Harrell has served the Southern Convention faithfully through the years as one of its able Presidents, as Chairman of the important Finance Committee, and as a member of the Board of Trustees of Elon College. In fact, there are few interests of our church where he has not served in various capacities, and with distinction to himself and honor to his Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Dr. Harrell has served our General Council as a member of its Executive Committee, and in interdenominational relationships he has been a useful leader. He served as one of the first Presidents of the N. C. Council of Churches.

At the 1954 session of the Southern Convention it was a logical action of the Convention to name Dr. Harrell as the Editor of *The Christian Sun*. Upon his retirement as pastor of the Durham Church, on November 1st, he is now devoting his energies to *The Christian Sun* as its editor. Mrs. Ed Chilton, Family Life chairman, stressed that Faith is a family affair.

Mrs. R. V. Powell, Interdenominational Cooperation chairman, had three women with posters tell of World Community Day, World Day of Prayer and May Fellowship Day.

Mrs. R. L. Jackson, Friendly Service chairman, explained the projects for this year, mentioning the layettes and the national quotas of friendly service.

The Thank Offering will go to the new South Boston Church.

The District Superintendents who were present were recognized, and each of them gave a brief report. New societies reported were: Ether, Shady Grove, Hendersonville, Center of South Boston, Pope's Chapel, Zion, Lee's Chapel and Bethlehem.

MORNING SESSION

The Eastern Virginia Christian Missionary Association held its sixtythird annual session at the Berea (Nansemond) Congregational Christian Church, Driver, Virginia, on Thursday, December 9, 1954.
