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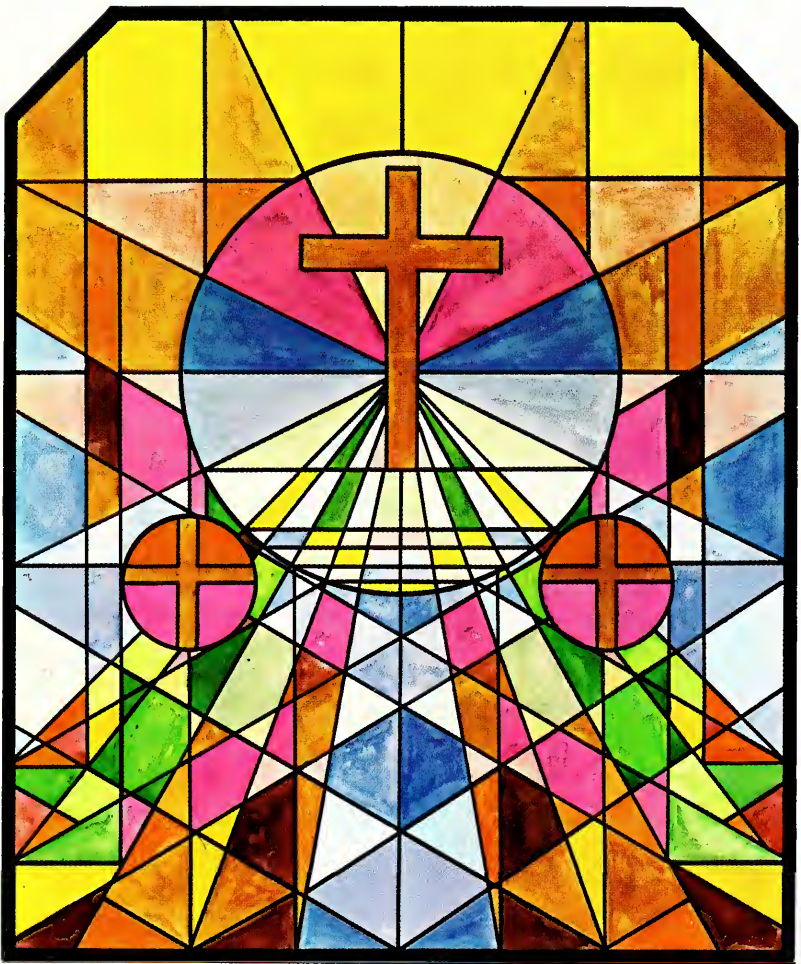

Constitution

ARTICLE I—NAME

This body shall be known as the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association of North Carolina.

ARTICLE II—PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this association to consider and promote measures for increasing the harmony, the knowledge and the spiritual life of the churches and for developing and directing their energies and their contributions in the advancement of Christ's kingdom throughout the earth, always in harmony with the teachings of the New Testament. This association shall be an auxiliary to the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in all their missionary, educational and benevolent work.

ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches desiring to affiliate with it. Each church may be represented in the annual associational meetings by its pastor and any other ordained ministers holding membership in it. In addition to these, each church may elect three (3) messengers for the first one hundred (100) members or major fraction thereof, plus one additional messenger for each additional one hundred (100) members or major fraction thereof, provided that no church shall be entitled to send more than ten (10) messengers.

Section 2. Any church desiring to become a member of the association shall present through messengers chosen for that purpose, its request for membership on APPLICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP provided in the minutes along with a UNIFORM ASSOCIATIONAL LETTER provided by the clerk at any annual session of the body. The Moderator shall refer the church to the Committee on New Churches for study and investigation. The church maintains for the year the status of associate membership until the committee makes its recommendation, if favorable, it will be received into full membership with all the rights and privileges at the next annual session. If the association then votes to receive the church, the moderator shall extend the hand of fellowship to the messengers.

Section 3. Any church not representing itself in this body for two successive years, either by letter or by messengers shall be stricken from the roll of churches, unless satisfactory reasons for such failure are given.

Section 4. The association shall withdraw fellowship from any church in its membership which shall be found to be disorderly in faith and practice, but not until written charges are brought against it, which charges shall have been authorized by the official act of the church offering the same. Thereafter, any such charges shall be carefully considered by the association.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. The officers of the association shall consist of a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Director of Music Ministry, School of Christian Studies Director, Director of Evangelism, Librarian and Representatives for the following: BIBLICAL RECORDER, Baptist Hospital, Children's Homes, Homes for Aging, Christian Higher Education, Annuity Board, American Bible Society, Home Missions, State Missions and Foreign Missions. These shall be elected annually on the second day of the annual session before the noon recess adjournment by a majority of the members voting and shall begin their term of office upon final adjournment of the session at which elected and shall continue in office until the close of the next annual session. Any officer may succeed himself, except the Moderator, who may not serve more than two years in succession.

The Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director and Director of Evangelism, will be elected at the Executive Committee Meeting in August. After their election they will become a part of the Nominating Committee.

Section 2. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint all committees not otherwise provided for, and exercise all other duties of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. He shall also, as far as his private duties may permit, visit and communicate with the churches between the sessions of the association to encourage and assist them in their work for the kingdom. He shall appoint a Nominating Committee and Committee on Committees at the annual meeting to serve for the following year. He shall be chairman of the Executive Committee and ex officio member of all other committees.

Section 3. The Vice-Moderator shall discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence, or at his request, and be Vice Chairman of the Executive Committee.

Section 4. The Clerk shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the association; shall superintend their printing and distribution to the churches; shall send one copy each to the General Secretary of the Baptist State Convention, the Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn., the American Baptist Publication Society, Philadelphia, Pa., and to our denominational agencies or institutions requesting them; shall preserve a file of all association records; shall provide at least one month prior to the annual session of the association, form letters for the use of the churches in making their reports to the association and shall suggest to each church, based on the actual cost of printing, the amount needed for the printing and distribution of the Annual. He shall serve as Secretary of the Executive Committee.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all funds of the association, as directed by the association, and make an itemized statement at each annual session.

Section 6. The Historian, in his sole discretion, shall collect facts of interest to the association and the cooperating churches, and shall make a report to each annual session of the association.

Section 7. The Trustees shall be three in number. It shall be their duty to hold in trust any property, endowment or other securities of this association, and to be representative of the association in legal matters.

ARTICLE V—COMMITTEES AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. At each annual session of the association the Moderator shall appoint a Nominating Committee composed of three members from as many different churches. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate and present to the association at its next annual session a complete slate of officers and institutional representatives. After presentation of these nominations the Moderator shall give opportunity for nominations from the floor for any and all of these positions. Should vacancies occur by death or resignation, it shall be the duty of this committee to name a person to fill the vacant position until the next annual session of the association, with the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. At each annual session of the association, the moderator shall appoint a Committee on Committees composed of seven members from as many different churches. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate and present to the association at its next annual session, members of all standing committees not otherwise provided for in this constitution. Should vacancies occur by death or resignation, it shall be the duty of this committee to name a person to fill the vacant position until the next annual session of the association, with the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE shall consist of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Sunday School Director, Associational Church Training Director, Director of Music Ministry, Associational W.M.U. Director, Associational Brotherhood Director and all the pastors of churches within the association together with one member from each church to be elected by the church. A quorum shall consist of ten (10) members of the committee, including four of the above mentioned officers, providing that either the Moderator or the Vice-Moderator is present. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to cooperate with the Baptist State Convention and with the churches of the association in the promotion of any plans which may seem wise for the extension of Christ's kingdom, and to take such steps as may be necessary to put into successful operation any plans adopted by the association. The committee shall meet at least once each quarter at a time to be agreed upon or at the call of the Moderator. The officers of the association shall be the officers of this committee with the Moderator serving as chairman.

Section 4. THE ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of the associational Sunday School Director, the associational Church Training Director, the associational Director of Music Ministry, the associational W.M.U. Director, the associational

Brotherhood Director and three pastors, who along with the chairman, shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees. It shall be the duty of this committee to cooperate with the associational Director of Missions in the extension of Baptist work throughout the associational area, and advise with him in matters pertaining to his work and activities. It shall also be the duty of the committee, in the event of a vacancy in the position of associational Director of Missions, to seek out and recommend to the Executive Committee or the association, a suitable person. It shall be the further duty of this committee to consult with the Finance Committee on matters of expense and to provide information to the Baptist State Convention officials which might be helpful in meeting missionary needs and to make recommendations to the association in matters of this kind.

Section 5. THE FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members with the Treasurer serving as ex officio member. It shall be the duty of this committee to plan and recommend to the Executive Committee and the association a financial budget for the coming year and to supervise the raising and expenditure of funds.

Section 6. THE COMMITTEE ON NEW CHURCHES shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to receive applications from churches seeking admission to the association and, after a visit or visits to such churches, careful investigation and deliberation, to report to the association on such applications in keeping with the provisions of this constitution.

Section 7. THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to study and recommend any necessary change in the constitution and bring reports as necessary to the association.

Section 8. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to arrange the program for the annual session of the association and present the same for adoption at its opening session. The Moderator and Director of Missions will serve as special advisors on this committee.

Section 9. PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to receive or solicit invitations for the place of meeting and to recommend to the annual session a place or places of meeting, preacher, and an alternate for such sermons or sermon to be presented in the discretion of the committee and the dates for the next annual session.

Section 10. THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to study and report on such resolutions as may be referred to it and to present such other resolutions as may be appropriate at the annual session.

Section 11. THE COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL SERVICE AND CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS shall be composed of three members from as many different churches whose duty it shall be to study the social and civic problems of our area, along with relevant literature available through the Christian Life Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention, and to report to the annual session of the association their findings along with recommendations for specific action by the association and/or cooperating churches.

Section 12. THE STEWARDSHIP AND COOPERATIVE PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duties it shall be to encourage each church to teach and practice Bible stewardship, to give to associational missions, and to support world mission causes through the Cooperative Program.

Section 13. THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM, composed of three members shall promote the work of evangelism in the association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the association or its Executive Committee.

Section 14. THE CALENDAR COMMITTEE shall be composed of the following associational officers: Director of Missions, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, W.M.U. Director, Brotherhood Director, Director of Music Ministry, and president of the Minister's Conference. This committee shall prepare an associational calendar for the year, and present same to the annual meeting, for adoption. This calendar shall be included in the annual.

Section 15. THE COMMITTEE ON ORDINATION, composed of seven ministers, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of candidates for the Gospel Ministry. Churches wishing to ordain ministers are requested to place their candidates before the committee at least thirty (30) days prior to the date set for ordination for examination on the following principles:

- a. Christian experience or conversion
- b. Call to the ministry

- c. Attitude toward denominational work and objects
- d. Support of denominational causes
- e. Moral and spiritual fitness
- f. Doctrinal beliefs
- g. Knowledge of the Bible

Candidates are to be ordained with the assistance of this committee only when they are serving a church or churches as pastor or having been called as pastor of a Baptist church of like faith and practice with those member churches of this association.

No candidate for ordination shall be considered by the committee who has not been a member of a cooperating church for at least one year.

Candidates are to be urged to prepare themselves for the ministry as far as possible in Baptist Institutions of Higher Learning.

This committee shall not recommend any candidate for ordination whom they feel will not bring honor and esteem to the Lord, to Southern Baptists and to the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association.

Recommendations will be made by the committee to the church where the candidate holds membership. The committee will assist the church in the ordination service at a time convenient to the church and to the members of the committee if such assistance is desired.

Section 16. THE COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS, composed of three members, shall bring a report at the annual meeting, leading in a memorial service, in memory of those reported by the churches as deceased since the last annual meeting.

Section 17. PROPERTIES COMMITTEE. This committee shall be composed of three members and shall have the responsibility of supervision of all properties belonging to the association and shall give attention to the condition of the properties owned by the association. This committee shall make such repairs or improvements as deemed necessary. All matters of major repairs or improvements shall be referred to the Finance Committee for action and recommendation to the Executive Committee. This committee shall make at least one inspection in each quarter of the year of all properties owned by the association.

ARTICLE VI—GENERAL PROVISIONS

Section 1. The employment of a Director of Missions shall follow the procedure outlined in Section 4, Article V, with the understanding that said person be extended an indefinite call and that a period of 30 days notice be given by either the missionary or the association in the event of termination of such employment.

Section 2. The Director of Missions, under the supervision of the Associational Missions Committee, shall be empowered to procure and supervise such necessary secretarial and janitorial personnel for the proper operation and maintenance of the associational office, provided that funds for the hiring and salary of such personnel have been included within the current year's budget.

Section 3. All questions of order not herein provided for shall be decided according to ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER, Revised.

Section 4. Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any annual session upon vote of two-thirds of the members present, provided that such amendments be presented on the first day of the annual session and voted upon the second day.

Section 5. ROTATING OF COMMITTEES. One-third of each committee shall be elected to serve a period of three years. Committees or parts of committees, composed of organizational heads shall not be subject to rotation. No member shall succeed himself. Vacancies occurring during the year may be filled immediately by the Executive Committee.

Section 6. SPECIAL ADVISORS. The Moderator and Director of Missions will serve on all committees of the association as special advisors.

Bylaws

1. The association shall convene annually on the first Monday in October and continue through the first Tuesday in October or longer in the judgment of the Committee on Order of Business and subject to the approval of the association.

2. Each session of the association shall be opened with religious exercise, conducted by whomsoever the Committee on Order of Business may designate.

3. A majority of the members present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of any business except the matter of making changes in the Constitution.

4. Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator, shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration, and avoid the use of unnecessary personalities.

5. The members shall observe toward the officers and towards one another such courtesies as are becoming to Christians.

6. The annual associational year, for the purpose of reporting statistical information shall be September 1 to August 31, inclusive.

7. Amendments to the By-Laws may be made by a majority vote of members present at any annual meeting of the association.

A POSITION DESCRIPTION FOR DIRECTOR OF ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS BRUSHY MOUNTAIN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

I. Position title

The title used in Brushy Mountain Baptist Association is Director of Missions.

II. Qualifications

- A. Spiritual Background—A committed Christian with a sense of definite call to mission service.
- B. Educational Background—One who recognizes the wisdom of continuing education, and one who has availed himself of the opportunities of formal education that have come to him.
- C. Special knowledge and skills—Knowledge of Baptist denominational life and a willingness to continue to learn; vision, flexibility and demonstrated leadership ability in planning, conducting and evaluating the work of the association.
- D. Character—Christian integrity.
- E. Experience—Active involvement in associational work either as a Director of Missions or an active and responsible officer in an association.

III. Call and Employment

He shall be called on vote of the Executive Committee on recommendation of the Missions Committee. (Or the association in the event that the annual meeting falls in the time for such action.)

IV. Basic functions.

He shall provide responsible leadership in the work of the association through performing such basic functions as the planning, correlation and implementation of programs, program services and ministries of the association; counsel to churches; interpretation of information; friendship with pastors; and good public relations.

V. Responsibilities

A. General leadership

1. Lead in associational strategy planning.
2. Lead in annual associational planning.
3. Lead in coordinating, conducting and evaluating the associational work.
4. Serve as ex officio member of all committees.
5. Counsel with and encourage associational and program officers through conferences and personal contacts.
6. Work with the moderator, program officers and the Nominating Committee in selecting and enlisting leaders for program organizations and committees of the association.
7. Lead in training leaders of program organizations and committees of the association.
8. Publish an associational newsletter on a regular basis. Use radio or whatever means he deems necessary to communicate information regarding associational work.
9. Manage with accountability the work of the association. Selection and termination of personnel employed by the association shall be with the approval of the Executive Committee.

- B. Personal ministries
 1. Provide counsel and help as requested by pastors and churches.
 2. Assist in church surveys and conduct studies as requested.
 3. Serve as pulpit supply of churches in association not to exceed four (4) consecutive Sundays in any one church without the approval of the Missions Committee.

C. Assigned Duties

Provide personal leadership and assistance to certain associational programs to meet special needs. Possible associational programs are:

1. Associational programs
 - a. Associated missions
 - b. Youth ministries
 - c. Student ministries
 - d. Community penetration
 - e. Mass media communication
 - f. Continuing ministerial education
 - g. Ministerial fellowship
 - h. Resort ministry
2. Church assistance programs
 - a. Church emphasis programs
 - (1) Evangelism development
 - (2) Stewardship development
 - (3) Vocational guidance
 - (4) Family services
 - b. Church organization programs
 - (1) Sunday School development
 - (2) Church Training development
 - (3) Church Music development
 - (4) Brotherhood development
 - (5) WMU development
 - c. Church service programs
 - (1) Church administration
 - (2) Church library development
 - (3) Church recreation development

D. Regular duties

1. Inform churches and people of the ministries and services of the association and of the denominational boards and agencies.
2. Assist in the correlation and promotion of the objectives of denominational boards and agencies through proper program officers of the association.
3. Attend denominational meetings and conferences as budget and time considerations permit.
4. Report to the Executive Committee at its regular meetings and to the association in annual session.

VI. Relationships

A. Internal (associational)

1. Maintain good working relationships with officers and committees of the association.
2. Maintain good relationships with pastors.
3. Maintain good relationships with church leaders.
4. Serve the association as its public relations officer.
5. Serve as principal administrative officer of the association.

B. External

1. Maintain cooperative relationships with other Baptist associations.
2. Maintain cooperative relationships with the state convention, the Home Mission Board and other Southern Baptist Convention boards and agencies.
3. Maintain good relationships with community groups with which the association and/or churches may cooperate.
4. Maintain good relationships with other denominational entities.

VII. Terms of employment

- A. Outside ministries—Four (4) weeks of revivals, military duty, World Missions Conferences, enlargement campaigns, training schools and such. Additional time may be approved by the Missions Committee.

- B. Vacation—Two weeks with full pay and allowances, with three weeks after five years of service.
- C. Work Schedule—While work schedules will vary, one day off per week is permitted and a normal work schedule should be announced and/or posted. Weekends normally should be kept for services in churches in the association.
- D. Sick Leave—One day of sick leave with pay shall accumulate for each month of service, the maximum being 90 days. In emergencies, the Missions Committee and Executive Committee shall have authority to grant additional time.
- H. Working accountability—Accountable to the Associational Executive Committee.
 - I. He shall be treated as any other minister in regard to honorariums for revivals or pulpit supply.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Executive Committee of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association met five times in the past year at Wilkesboro Baptist Church, the 4th meeting (July 19) being a "called" meeting for the sole purpose of extending a call to Dr. William C. McKinney to become the Director of Missions for Brushy Mountain Baptist Association, beginning September 1, 1976.

November 3, 1975 there were 24 people present representing 15 churches. The following reports were given: The Properties Committee reported that painting had been completed on the parsonage, a new roof had been put on the well house, trees had been pruned, and that Mr. Paul Hudler had been hired as grounds-keeper and to do janitorial work at the office. The Sunday School Director, Bryce Greene, reported that for High Attendance Day in Sunday School on Nov. 2, 1975 attendance was 5,176—666 above average attendance. Various other organizational reports were given.

A motion was passed at this meeting to follow the recommendation of the Missions Committee to apply for \$1000.00 in State Aid for 1976. Al Andrews announced plans for the Lay Evangelism School which was held Feb. 23-26. E. W. McMurray (chm. Miss. Com.) announced that the search for a Director of Missions had begun.

February 9, 1976 there were 20 people present representing 13 churches. Organizational reports were given as follows: Missions Committee Chairman, McMurray announced that Bill Ballou had rejected consideration of a call to be Director of Missions for the Association. McMurray (General Board Representative) reported that \$1000.00 in State Aid requested by the Association had been granted, to be paid in monthly payments only when the Association has a Director of Missions. McMurray also reported that an Installation Service for Dr. Cecil Ray, Executive Secretary of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention was to be held on March 30, in Raleigh, N. C.

The following recommendations were passed: 1) That the Missions Committee should have the authority to pay expenses from the association treasury of any person coming for an interview with the Missions Committee concerning the Director of Missions position, and 2) That the Association Office secretary be paid 15 cents per mile for travel (trips to the Post Office, Bank, etc.) until a new Director of Missions is secured.

The next meeting of the Executive Committee was May 3, 1976. There were 18 persons in attendance at this meeting representing 14 churches. At this meeting the Rev. Vaughn Brown, Moderator resigned, having been called to a pastorate in the Briar Creek Association. Various reports were as follows: The Treasurer's report showed a balance of \$10,668.48. Organiza-

tional reports: E. W. McMurray, Chairman of the Missions Committee, reported that the search for a Director of Missions was at a stand-still and asked that the Committee be given permission to negotiate terms of salary with prospects. The Executive Committee authorized the Missions Committee to offer up to a maximum of \$2,000.00 more than the present salary and benefits listed in the budget for the Director of Missions position. The Nominating Committee recommended Paul Shoupe for Moderator to replace Vaughn Brown. The Executive Committee approved this recommendation. The W. M. U., Brotherhood, and Church Training reports were given.

The Executive Committee met on July 19, 1976 in a "called" meeting for the sole purpose of extending a call to Dr. William C. McKinney, Lawndale, N. C. as the new Director of Missions for the Association. There were 33 persons present representing 17 churches. E. W. McMurray, Chairman of the Missions Committee, presented the McKinneys. Max Freeman gave a biographical sketch of Mr. McKinney. A position description for Director of Missions of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association was presented by Carl Elledge. After discussion and minor changes, it was adopted. E. W. McMurray proposed the following budget changes for the Director of Missions: 1) The Salary be increased from \$6,402.00 to \$7,200.00; 2) The amount for Social Security be increased from \$520.00 to \$760.00; 3) The amount for Annuity be increased from \$520.00 to \$1,000.00; 4) The amount for Conventions and Conferences be increased from \$400.00 to \$500.00. These changes were adopted by the Executive Committee. The Missions Committee Chm., E. W. McMurray, moved that the call be extended to the Rev. Mr. McKinney. It was the unanimous opinion of the Executive Committee that Mr. McKinney's moving expenses should be paid. The Missions Committee was given a standing vote of appreciation for the work done in the seeking of Dr. McKinney. Carl Elledge was also recognized for his radio ministry in promoting Associational Missions in the absence of a Director.

The final meeting of the Executive Committee was on August 2, 1976, with 16 persons present representing 12 churches. The treasurer reported a financial balance on hand of \$13,411.12. The Secretary of the Missions Committee, the Rev. Carl Elledge, brought items for discussion and the following motions were passed:

1. That Paul G. Hudler, office groundskeeper, be paid an extra \$50.00 for mowing the parsonage lawn all summer when it was not part of his regular duties.
2. That the Association pay the expenses of moving the new Director of Missions into the parsonage.
3. That the Miscellaneous Fund in the budget be replenished in the amount used by the Missions Committee in its work of securing a new Director of Missions.
4. That former Association office secretary, Christine Holman, be employed to help with the Book of Reports at the same hourly wage now being paid the present secretary.
5. That a program and reception be held on September 5, 1976 at 3:00 P.M. at Wilkesboro Baptist Church to welcome the new Director of Missions, the Rev. Dr. William C. McKinney and his family. The Missions Committee was given authority to plan the event and use money from the Miscellaneous Fund for expenses.
6. That money from the General Fund be used to pay the moving expenses of the new Director of Missions.
7. To appropriate the necessary money and empower the Properties Committee to make necessary repairs at the associational parsonage.
8. To provide draperies, drapery hardware, and window coverings for the parsonage.

Dean Dillard, chairman of the Nominating Committee recommended the following officers for the coming year: Church Training—Rev. Carl Elledge; Sunday School—Mr. Bryce Greene; WMU—Mrs. Robert Foster; Brotherhood—Mr. Max Freeman; Music Director—Mr. Ellihu Sloan.

HISTORY OF CUB CREEK CHURCH

The history of this church from 1862 to 1955 is recorded in the 1955 associational minutes on pages 32 to 35.

The church membership has grown from 161 in 1955 to the present 339. Sunday School membership has increased from 185 to 203.

Many changes in the buildings have taken place. An educational building of twelve rooms and two restrooms was built in 1956. In 1961 new stained glass windows were installed in the sanctuary. A parsonage and three acres of land joining the church property were purchased in March, 1962. Extensive remodeling of the parsonage was done in 1965. The parking lot was paved and new steps and sidewalks constructed in 1966. The present Fellowship Hall was built during 1973 and 1974. In 1975 the sanctuary of the church was remodeled with installation of a baptistry, air conditioning and new carpet.

The following men have served as pastors: Rev. Clate Brown, 1950—Jan. 1958; Rev. R. A. Call, 1958—Jan. 1960; Rev. Mack McCurdy, 1960—Jan. 1969; Rev. N. C. Teague, interim pastor, Feb. 1969—August 1969; Rev. Glenn Byrd, August 1969—to present.

The church ordained as deacons: Wade Ashley, Odell Haynes (now deceased), Willard Lane, and Jesse Johnson on October 9, 1955; Danny Wyatt on October 16, 1960; Ralph Fletcher, Jim Joines, and William Mark Johnson on April 19, 1964. Other deacons who are now serving are Robert Pegram, Charlie Cain and Fred Eldreth.

Church Clerks: Robert C. Pegram, 1955-1961; Mrs. Linda B. Howell, 1961-1962; Mrs. Jean Wyatt, 1962-1966; James Carson, 1966-1967; Mrs. June Fletcher, 1967-1971; Mrs. Carolyn Anderson, 1971-1973; Gary C. Jordan, 1973-to present.

Sunday School Superintendents: Danny Wyatt, 1956-1961; Billy Anderson, 1962-1971; Commie Johnson 1971-to present.

The Church has three active choirs.

During this time the church has ordained two ministers. Woodrow Key was ordained on March 25, 1962 and Jim Wyatt on January 10, 1971.

On September 30, 1962 a special 100th Anniversary celebration was held with a large crowd attending including many former pastors.

Cub Creek Church has all the mission organizations. Over and above the regular mission offerings, since 1961 it has contributed to the support of missionaries Vic and Louise Carlson, with \$1,000 included in the present budget.

Daytime Vacation Bible Schools have been held each year.

Appreciation is extended to the Reverend Glenn Byrd and to Mrs. Faye Joines for the history and assistance.

A BRIEF HISTORICAL PERIOD 1973 1976 FISHING CREEK BAPTIST CHURCH

The Annual of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association recorded the history of Fishing Creek Church for the short period of time between the years of 1965 and 1972.

This brief sketch will be from the years 1973 through 1976.

In April 1973 the church started a library and the books were contributed by the church members. During the months from May until July 1973, beds were built in the nursery by Paul Pardue. Carpet was laid in both nursery rooms. Also in July, additional parking space was paved and the existing parking area was repaved at the cost of \$3,739.00.

In December 1973 the church members participated in the Christmas parade and made pictures for the church annual.

Work was begun on the cemetery, in March 1974, that joins the church grounds. Four inch borders were placed around the stones above the ground. Unnecessary trees and grass were removed and grass and fertilizer were sown. In November 1974 the church voted to begin the construction of an educational building with the members doing as much of the work as possible. The building plan calls for a two story building with 6,612 square feet of floor space.

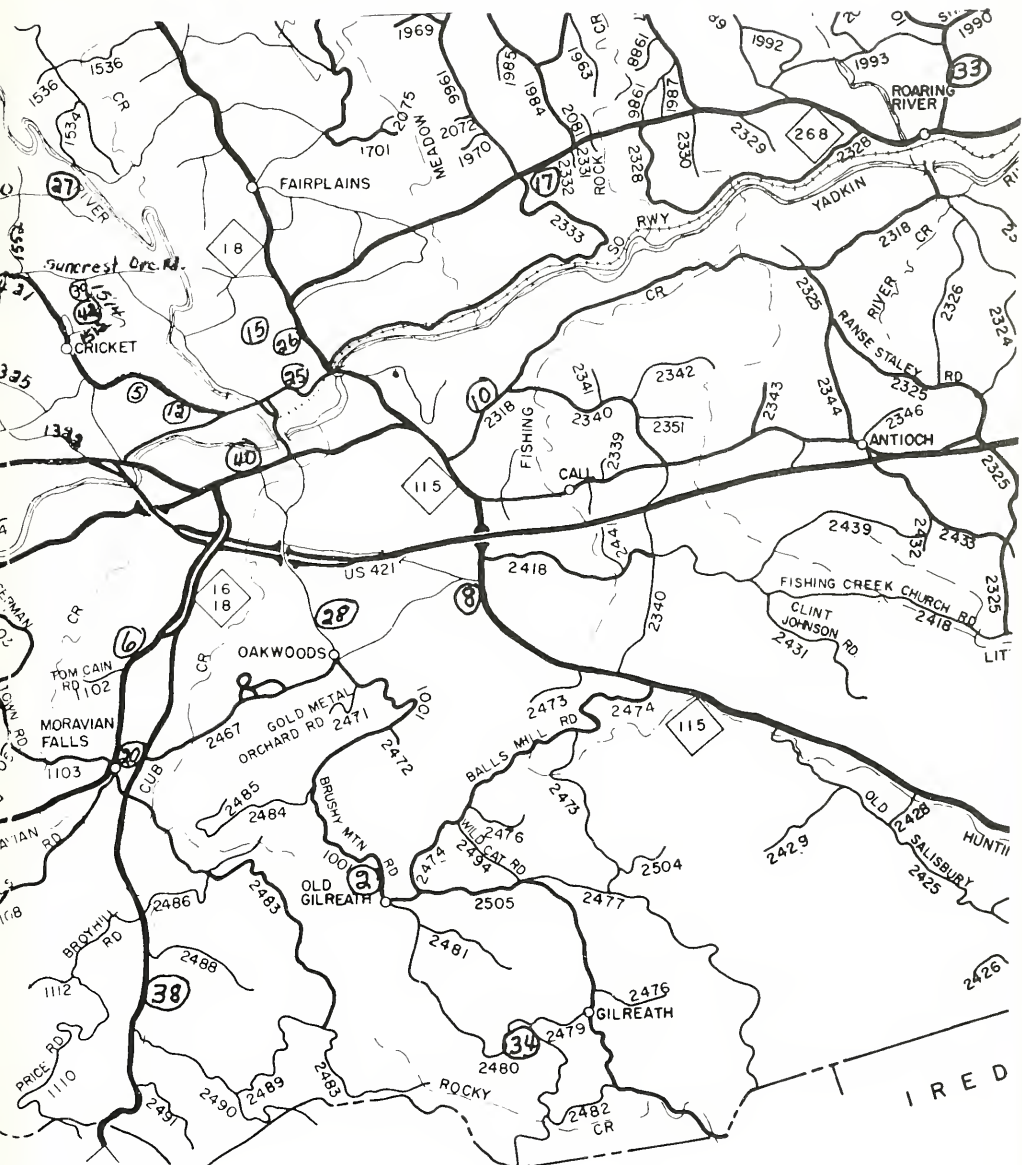
The church observed Homecoming Day August 10, 1975. The message of the day was delivered by the Reverend Carl Walker. A revival was held the following week and 10 members were added to the church by baptism.

On October 26, 1975 Ray Vaughn Brown, Wade Walsh, LeRoy Williams and Jerry Osborne were ordained as deacons. The Reverend I. V. Couch preached the ordination sermon. Deacons of neighboring churches assisted the Fishing Creek deacons.

We are grateful to the Rev. Carl Elledge for carrying on our radio program while we were without a Director of Missions. He has kept the Association and State Convention work before the public in a wonderful way. Thanks, Carl, for a job well done.

We are grateful to Mrs. Douglas Wood, our Clerk-Treasurer-Secretary, for the fine work she has done in carrying on the work of our Associational Office and publishing the Brushy Mountain Herald each month while we have been without a Director of Missions. We wish to thank Mrs. Albert Holman for coming back and helping with the Church Letters and our Book of Reports for the association.

Let us pray for outreach of churches and pastors. We have 41 churches and 2 missions and pastors for each of these. We are sorry we cannot report 100% cooperation from churches or pastors. It is so true, "As the pastor, so goes the church." So pastors, we are counting on you.

Let us pray for our associational leaders. This is a large group of people. We have 13 general officers of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association, 105 other officers and committee members, the Executive Promotion Committee of the association which transacts the business of the association between sessions of the association. This committee is made up of the 13 general officers, pastors of the 41 churches and one member elected from each of the churches and the two missions to represent them. The committee meets once each quarter.

FOREIGN MISSION REPORT

A record budget of \$51,036,424 for 1976 was voted by the Foreign Mission Board in October. An increase of 12% over the '75 budget. Funds received over the '75 budget were used to assist students in Baptist schools in Lebanon and for disaster relief in Lebanon and Turkey.

books on the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering were closed for 1975 on April 30, 1976. Total received was \$26,169,421. This is \$2,935,327 above the 1974 total. Also Southern Baptist gave one and one half million to World Relief through the Foreign Mission Board.

Heading the list of request for 1976 from the Foreign Mission Board was 1,217 new Southern Baptist Missionaries for evangelistic workers. Divided into 46 categories, half for evangelism and church development, a large number needed for medical missions, and others for teaching, business administration, agriculture and many other fields.

As of December 31, 1975, Southern Baptist missionary personnel assigned overseas was 2,667. This included 2,300 career missionaries, 206 associates, 156 journeymen, 5 special projects. Of this number 265 were new appointments, the largest group sent in one year by Southern Baptist. Preaching the gospel of Jesus Christ to every person in the world is the overall objective plans for the next 25 years of the Foreign Mission Board. The Board envisions by the year 2,000 at least 100% increase in the number of missionaries (from 2,645 to 5,000); a 50% increase in the number of countries (from 82 to 124) and more lay volunteer involvement.

Foreign Mission study for fall 1976 focus on schools and student work overseas. The Lottie Moon Christmas offering that accompanies our Week of Prayer for Foreign Missions has been set for \$29,000,000. The Week of Prayer is to be observed November 28 through December 5, 1976.

STATE MISSIONS REPORT

State Missions includes a variety of missions and ministries. Most of the ministries are cooperative efforts of local churches, district associations, the State Convention and the Home Missions Board.

In fact, most Home Missions programs in our state receive 64 percent of their financial support from State Missions. Also, many Associational Mission projects are funded, in part, by State Missions.

A good example of the cooperativeness of State Missions is Resort Missions. In almost every case, a Resort Mission project involves people and money from one or several local churches near the ministry. The association also provides guidance and support in order to involve a broad base of church support.

The 1976 State Missions offering goal is \$400,000—\$175,000 for the basic State Missions Budget, \$43,000 to pay on the Crouch class room at Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute, \$72,000 for payment on Caraway Conference Center, \$10,000 for special missions projects, and \$100,000 (or all over \$300,000) for long-range planning and development at N. C. Baptist Assembly (Caswell) at Southport.

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

In 1975 the Home Missions Board's Program of Evangelism was joined by two more programs (Personal Evangelism and Mass Evangelism). With the Bold Mission Thrust, efforts have been made to share the gospel with each individual, with special emphasis directed toward the 600 counties in the U. S. that do not have a Southern Baptist Congregation.

Disaster relief needs in five states were given funds totaling \$44,000.

In the Chaplaincy Division 200 denominational endorsements were granted. Those in active service totaled 837, plus 510 in reserve categories. Southern Baptist Chaplains reported 11,689 professions of faith in 1975.

During 1975 the Division of Church Loans gave counsel to approximately 1,300 churches. Loan applications from 185 churches were processed and approved for \$12,190,095.

Respective departments continue to assist black churches and promote interfaith awareness. The Immigration and Refugee Service staff has assisted with Camp Ministries and resettlement of 2,777 persons in 768 refugee families.

The Division of Associational Missions has provided training courses for 59 new Directors of Missions and had part in various other training and planning programs.

The 1975 Annie Armstrong Easter Offering receipts totaled \$8,491,653, missing the goal by less than one tenth of one percent. The Cooperative Program receipts were up 8.95 percent.

At the close of 1975 a total of 2,124 missionaries were under HMB appointment. This force was augmented by 1,208 student summer workers: 28 semester missionaries and 34 Sojourners. More than 10,000 youths and adults served one or two weeks through church sponsored mission programs and 141 adults served in the Christian Service Corps.

A new Executive Director is being sought to replace Arthur B. Rutledge, who has spent 18 years with the HMB and retires at the end of 1976.

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

The faithful stewardship of individual Christians and the missionary vision of our churches, expressed through their support of the Cooperative Program enables Southern Baptists to maintain a growing World Missions Program. The stewardship theme for this year is "Bold Believers in Giving." Through the Cooperative Program we demonstrate our mission commitment.

During the past year the churches of our association gave \$69,460 through the Cooperative Program. Last year our churches gave \$18,509 for associational missions. Our goal was \$20,115.00.

Last year, 1126 churches increased their gifts through the Cooperative Program by 15% or more, and 4 associations in our state had 100 percent of their churches giving through the Cooperative Program.

2. That a stewardship conference or Stewardship Decision Night be held for interested churches in order to make available to them guidance materials for use in their stewardship programs.
3. That every church conduct a stewardship emphasis this year.
4. Every church in the association giving something through the Cooperative Program for world mission support, every month.
5. Every church in the association increasing the percentage of the total budget income given through the Cooperative Program.
6. Every church in the association giving the suggested amount for the support of associational missions, EVERY MONTH.
7. Have a special prayer for some Cooperative Program ministry during every service in each church during the month of October.

HOMES FOR THE AGING REPORT

Your North Carolina Baptist Homes have, in the past year, completed 25 years of growth and development. These have been good years, filled with the abundant blessings and goodness of the Lord. He has brought us from one Home, in March of 1951, to five Homes and an excellent Nursing Facility, from one resident to 230 residents and patients. Hundreds have been ministered to during these years, many lives have been blessed, and families have been helped immeasurably.

The past year has been of special excitement and enthusiasm as we entered into the Fund-Raising Effort to raise \$1,000,000 for the construction of the Western North Carolina Baptist Home in Asheville. In September, 1975, Brother Ralph Cannon, beloved pastor, and Trustee of the Homes, was called by the Trustees to serve as Director of Development and Denominational Relations and has been leading the fund raising program for the Western North Carolina Baptist Home in a remarkable way. He reports that the response from our Baptist pastors and people in Western North Carolina has been most encouraging, and that there is every indication that we will reach the goal. We are grateful not only to those in Western North Carolina, but throughout the State, for the happy and successful response that we have experienced thus far as we move toward making this additional Home available for our older people in one of the most beautiful spots in the world.

When completed, the Western North Carolina Home, in Asheville, will accommodate 50 people, and will bring the total capacity of our Baptist Homes and the Nursing Care Unit to 280. We now operate five other Homes, and a Nursing Care Unit, in Winston-Salem; the Albermarle Home, in Albemarle; the Hamilton Home, in Hamilton, the Yanceyville Home, in Yanceyville.

Close at hand is another venture in the development of the Homes which we're excited—the building of apartments on the site of the Hayes Home property in Winston-Salem. The first of these units is to be completed by the fall of 1977. Those interested in this phase of the ministry of Baptist Homes may contact Bill Poole, the Executive Director, of the Homes for information.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

Southern Baptist churches depend on the Annuity Board to provide retirement and insurance protection to pastors and others in church-related vocations. The Annuity Board helps churches and SBC agencies get the best coverage at the most advantageous rates in life, health, and disability insurance.

The Board holds in trust retirement contributions from nearly 40,000 persons. Their contributions will be converted into annuity benefits when they retire. Funds held in trust by the Annuity Board now amount to \$401,135,261. This must be divided among the 40,000 annuitants and serve their lifetime, post-retirement needs.

In 1975, income from the investment of funds held in trust attained a one-year record of \$23,149,064. Benefits paid to retirees, widows, and the disabled amounted to \$15,734,003. A 13th check issued in December, 1975, provided 8,221 annuitants with an extra month's income to help them combat the rapidly rising cost of living. The combined amount of this extra benefit came to \$733,585. It is called the 13th Check because it is over and above the 12 regular monthly payments.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

"Christian stewardship" is a phrase frequently heard in staff meetings at Baptist Hospital. The hospital's leadership holds to a philosophy of administration based on stewardship and tries to pass this on to all employees.

This sense of stewardship demands a continual updating and upgrading of medical procedures to assure patients the highest quality care. One of the most significant recent developments is the creation of a department of Family Medicine. This department provides primary health care for a limited number of families, and offers training in family medicine for physicians who will enter this field of practice. This will help to balance the trend of recent years toward increased specialization.

Many of the physicians training in family medicine are receiving part of their clinical experience in small towns and rural communities under the auspices of the Area Health Education Centers (AHEC), created by the State legislature. It is believed that some of them will choose to remain in these areas.

Improvement of physical facilities is another expression of the hospital's sense of stewardship. In recent months renovation of the west and south wings of the hospital has been completed; construction has been completed on an addition to the water-chilling facilities; construction has begun on a 4-level parking deck which will provide approximately 800 parking spaces for visitors; and construction has begun on a new building to house the new department of Family Medicine.

The Pastoral Care Department continues to make its contributions toward the fulfillment of our stewardship. A chaplain is assigned to each area of the hospital and is responsible for providing a pastoral ministry to patients, staff and visitors in that area. There are capacity enrollments in all phases of the Clinical Pastoral Education programs. A third satellite has opened in

Morganton during the past year.

Mother's Day gifts for the fiscal year ending June 30 were \$405,946.52 compared to a total of \$390,000 for the preceding fiscal year.

BAPTIST COLLEGES REPORT

Baptists in North Carolina have been closely identified with Christian higher education for 142 years. A careful reading of North Carolina Baptist history reveals that the Baptist State Convention was organized primarily for the purpose of establishing a Baptist College, (Wake Forest Institute 1834). Today, our Association is helping support six other colleges in addition to Wake Forest: Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, Meredith, and Wingate.

North Carolina Baptists' partnership with these institutions of higher learning finds tangible expression year after year in many ways, including the following:

1. We continue to support these schools through the Cooperative Program and the Baptist College Day offering on Father's Day.
2. The colleges continue to provide training for most of the pastors and other church staff persons who lead our churches.
3. Our churches also help the colleges in their efforts to recruit Baptist young people by furnishing the names of high school students for contact by the colleges.
4. The colleges pledge to North Carolina Baptist youth that financial aid is available to assist them in attending a Baptist college. No qualified student is turned away for financial reasons. Grants, loans, and work scholarships are available.

In a secular world with its materialistic priorities, Baptist Colleges are committed to the guidance of Christian values in the search for truth. Believing that God is the source of all knowledge and wisdom, Baptist colleges can urge students to search for truth in all areas of knowledge without fear.

Our Baptist schools are most appreciative of our continued support and prayers. This partnership we enjoy is crucial to the continuation of Christian higher education in our state. May we, in this Association, do our part to help insure these educational opportunities for our youth.

TRIBUTE TO DR. BUDD SMITH

Mr. Moderator, fellow Baptists of the Brushy Mountain Association. Before we hear the report on Higher Christian Education, I feel it is appropriate to pay tribute to a man who dedicated his life to this end. Dr. Budd Smith, President of Wingate College from 1953-1974 passed away on August 5, 1976 after a heart attack. Dr. Budd, as he was known to all, dedicated himself to this cause as a student, scientist, biologist, teacher and administrator. He came to Wingate College in 1953 as President at a time when things did not look prosperous for the college in that the college was some \$300,000 in debt, with only six buildings on a campus of 33 acres, with a student enrollment of 180. For the next 21 years, we observed what has been described as a miracle take place at Wingate College, the end result being a campus of 300 acres with more than 40 prominent buildings valued at \$18 million debt free, and an enrollment of 1,300 students. I am not suggesting that Dr. Budd accomplished this alone but am suggesting that

God through his servant, with his abilities and talents this was accomplished. He gave of himself fully with many personal sacrifices to see this dream come true for Wingate College. Dr. Budd had a firm belief in God and expressed this each and every day by setting an example of a Christian and expressing his belief through personal testimony often.

He was a friend, teacher, administrator and leader to many hundreds of which I am included. For this I am thankful and grateful, the opportunities that were afforded me while a student and for our friendship through the years since. I know that we as Baptists are stronger today because he shared his life with us and gave his ideas as a Christian leader. For his life will live for many years to come through the lives of the many he touched. So today, I appreciate this opportunity to express what I am sure hundreds of others would express, "that is, we thank God for the life here on earth of Dr. Budd Smith and pay tribute to his life and for the many accomplishments he left for us to carry on. We ask for God's guidance for Mrs. Smith, his wife and former teacher of many of us and his two sons, Sam and Bill, in their endeavors.

FRUITLAND REPORT

In the western hills of North Carolina, 7 miles east of Hendersonville, off route 64, is a community called Fruitland where Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute is located. The school was founded in 1946, when the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina asked the Rev. J. C. Canipe to become its first director. The purpose of the school has been to provide training for ministers who cannot enter college for the full degree program. Though the quality of the school is certified by the state of N. C., it will never seek accreditation as a degree granting institution because it has a special purpose.

The new W. Perry Crouch Building, completed in 1972, provides a chapel which will seat about three hundred. It has eight classrooms which seat about thirty-five, a faculty lounge and the library. The school has changed its schedule of quarters so that it now operates year-round with a full four quarters each year. The first summer quarter had more than 225 students enrolled. It appears that there will be a full constant operation of the school with quarters beginning in January, March, June and September. Applications are still coming in about two to three quarters ahead. The fall and winter quarters are filled already and about half of the spring quarter for 1977.

Part of the school's support is through the cooperative program. The director of the school is Alex L. Booth, Jr.

BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

During the 1975-76 fiscal year, the North Carolina Baptist Foundation has continued to be used as a channel for Baptists of our state to provide a tangible support for missions in a perpetual way for the years to come. Through a will of a person who had received financial assistance years ago from our Baptist Hospital, a \$29,950 trust was established with the Baptist Foundation to provide income for the hospital's needy patients. The income of the investment for one year will repay what the hospital provided in financial assistance to this person.

The children of one family, upon the settlement of the estate of their father, placed all the residence of the estate with the Foundation to establish a trust in memory of their parents for Foreign Mission support. Their mother and dad had long been interested in this area of our Christian ministry.

A widow has established a living trust turning over all of her property and financial assets for the remainder of her life, reserving the right to income, and upon her death it will then be divided among several institutions and mission causes, one of which will be mission ministries in the local association.

New additions during the 1975-76 year to the North Carolina Baptist Foundation assets held for our institutions and missions totaled \$210,147.17. This brings the total market value of assets to \$2,946,044.49. The income from Foundation trust funds paid to beneficiaries during

1975-76 was \$157,069.28. Wills still account for a major portion of the assets of the Foundation but the annuity trust accounts comprise \$480,270 of the total value of assets.

Foster Care is offered the preschooler and the older child who needs the closer relationships of a family setting. Maternity Care is offered the unwed mother and her child. Preschool care and education are offered a select group of younger children. Consultation in child development and family life education is offered to churches concerned for families and children in their communities. Varied planning and counselling services are offered to families in stress.

To make these varied services available to families and children, a statewide network of facilities and programs has emerged. Indian Beach, Kinston, Pembroke, Fayetteville, Raleigh, Burlington, Wallburg, Thomasville, Charlotte, Forest City, Asheville, Waynesville—each site is a base of operations from which families in need can secure assistance. Furthermore, the staff is prepared to call on the additional resources of religious, educational, medical, psychological, recreational, and social service personnel in the communities to help persons grow to their full potential.

No greater investment can be made in the future of God's Kingdom or in the future of America than to invest in children. Your support of missions through the Cooperative Program is the lifeline of the Baptist Children's Homes. Your special gift at Thanksgiving further guarantees the continuance of Christian child care. The staff and children of the Baptist Children's Homes pledge ourselves to make the most of the opportunity your investment provides.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

The Bicentennial year of our nation brought celebrations all across the country, and the American Bible Society participated in this great Celebration in many ways as it distributed the word of God between the beautiful covers of the Stars and Stripes.

Forty years younger than our nation, the ABS grew up with the new nation and made sure America always had available copies of God's Word to guide them. Dedicated to the translation, publication and distribution of the Word of God, the ABS, working with the United Bible Societies around the world, provided the Scriptures to more people than ever, at home and abroad in 1975. At least one book of the Bible has now been translated into 1,577 languages.

A milestone in the development of the Common Language Translation will be reached late in 1976 in "The Good News Bible." This entire Bible in today's English version is scheduled to be released during the 160th anniversary of the American Bible Society. This translation will be the Society's Bicentennial Gift to the people of the United States. It makes available for the first time the entire Bible in easily understood language.

Taking advantage of every opportunity for distribution of God's Word in 1975, many individuals, churches, and other organizations were reached with copies of Scripture. One such opportunity came with the start of American's Freedom Train, a 17,000 mile journey around the U. S. presenting copies of the Scripture to cities' leading citizens and officials, churches and individuals as well.

During 1975, 265,915,387 copies of the Scriptures were distributed throughout the world by the United Bible Societies. Of these 109,469,781 copies were distributed in the United States. This is an increase of 11,181,000 copies in the United States alone over 1974.

The American Bible Society gives special thanks to the Southern Baptist Convention for its continuing cooperation with the ABS in supporting the Bible cause, and asks your continued prayers, that the Bible Society, in partnership with the Southern Baptist Convention may fulfill more effectively, its task of bringing the Word of God to all those who ask for it, and need it.

There was an overflow in attendance of more than 2,600 pastors and lay persons at the 30th Statewide Evangelism Conference at the Civic Center Auditorium, Asheville—February 2-4, 1976. Lay persons and pastors continue to respond to the emphasis on lay witness training through Lay Evangelism Schools. During the past 4 1/2 years, 14,284 youth and adults have participated in these schools from 1,150 churches and 62 associations. During the last evenings of the 62 weeks of schools there have been 896 professions of faith made by youth and adults in their homes.

The Lay Evangelism School held Feb. 23-26 was the spiritual highlight of the year through cooperative efforts in evangelism in the Brushy Mountain Association.

There were 18 churches participating with 227 persons enrolled for the school. The Thursday evening visitation produced 11 professions of faith with many other spiritual experiences reported.

About 525 youth and adults attended the Youth Ministry Week—June 14-18—at the North Carolina Baptist Assembly with the emphasis on youth evangelism, vocational guidance, and recreation. Fifty-three different types of decisions for Christ were made by youth.

Thousands of youth, pastors, and adult leaders attended the 6th Statewide Youth Evangelism Night—August 13—at the Greensboro Coliseum. Barry Wood of Lubbock, Texas was the guest preacher, and Larry McFadden of Gainesville, Fla. was the guest soloist.

Two summer youth evangelism teams are directing youth revivals and youth witness training in eighteen churches across the state for a one week period in each church. Already there has been an excellent response and youth are making decisions for Christ.

The Division of Evangelism is continuing to cooperate with the Brotherhood Department in Lay Renewal Weekends and Ministry Evangelism Weekends.

A new area of work will be Youth Evangelism Strategy with an emphasis on four phases: Leadership Family; Touch Ministry; Discipleship Groups; and Joy Explosion. W. O. W.—Win Our World—is included in this strategy and involves specific witness training for youth.

The 31st Statewide Evangelism Conference will be February 7-9, 1977 at the War Memorial Auditorium in Greensboro.

GENERAL BOARD REPORT

Between sessions of the Baptist State Convention, the General Board has charge and control of all work of the Convention except the activities designated to the Boards of Trustees of its institutions and agencies. It is composed of one member from associations with less than 20,000 membership; two members from associations with memberships of 20,000—40,000; three members from associations with more than 40,000 membership and one from each of the ten regions.

The General Board meets three times a year: at Raleigh in January, on a college campus in June or July, and at Caraway in October. In cases of emergency, other meetings could be called.

Officers of the Board are President, Vice-President and Recording Secretary. Each member of the Board is given a choice of the committee through which he will serve. The committees are: Council of Christian Life, Christian Higher Education, Evangelism, Church Programs, Missions and Social Services. For the sake of efficiency, from these committees are formed many sub-committees. Your Brushy Mountain member this past year was privileged to serve on the Missions Committee. He attended the January meeting of the Board and the Missions Committee in Raleigh. In March he attended the Orientation Session of the Missions Committee at the Baptist Building in Raleigh. The October meeting shall be held at Camp Caraway on October 14-15.

All board members are sent copies of Executive Committee Minutes. A policy of openness is practiced by the General Board. All minutes of the Executive Committee and the General Board are kept in an official record book in the Baptist Building and are open for examination by any member of a participating church upon request.

The opportunity to serve is appreciated.

BIBLICAL RECORDER REPORT

The Old Testament prophet Hosea declared, "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge." Because of a great information void concerning truth, Jeremiah also cried out, "Publish and conceal not."

Just as in Old Testament days, communication still remains one of the most sensitive problems in our churches. Think for a moment—how many problems has your church had that could be traced to a lack of communication? Too many church members are misled because they are uninformed, poorly informed, or misinformed. Churches must take initiative to pro-

vide accurate information if work in the local church, association, and convention continue to show progress.

Each year more churches understand the importance of providing the RECORDER for each family. When this is done, members become more responsive because they are better informed. Baptists have made encouraging progress in recent years through bold mission enterprises and this can be traced to better-informed church members. Stewardship gains also go hand in hand with better communications. As an example, 79 of 80 churches which led their associations in per capita mission gifts last year have a RECORDER CLUB.

Each church needs to look at its budget carefully and then make provision to send the RECORDER to each family. Although nearly 1,100 churches in the state have the RECORDER in the budget, at least 500 more churches should take this step. Such action could be the difference between mediocrity and greatness in your church.

For 143 years the RECORDER has gone into the homes of North Carolina Baptists. We are extremely grateful to the editor and his staff for an outstanding job in making us aware of the issues relative to our denomination.

Constitution

ARTICLE I—NAME

This body shall be known as the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association of North Carolina.

ARTICLE II—PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this association to consider and promote measures for increasing the harmony, the knowledge and the spiritual life of the churches and for developing and directing their energies and their contributions in the advancement of Christ's kingdom throughout the earth, always in harmony with the teachings of the New Testament. This association shall be an auxiliary to the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in all their missionary, educational and benevolent work.

ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches desiring to affiliate with it. Each church may be represented in the annual associational meetings by its pastor and any other ordained ministers holding membership in it. In addition to these, each church may elect three (3) messengers for the first one hundred (100) members or major fraction thereof, plus one additional messenger for each additional one hundred (100) members or major fraction thereof, provided that no church shall be entitled to send more than ten (10) messengers.

Section 2. Any church desiring to become a member of the association shall present through messengers chosen for that purpose, its request for membership on APPLICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP provided in the minutes along with a UNIFORM ASSOCIATIONAL LETTER provided by the clerk at any annual session of the body. The Moderator shall refer the church to the Committee on New Churches for study and investigation. The church maintains for the year the status of associate membership until the committee makes its recommendation, if favorable, it will be received into full membership with all the rights and privileges at the next annual session. If the association then votes to receive the church, the moderator shall extend the hand of fellowship to the messengers.

Section 3. Any church not representing itself in this body for two successive years, either by letter or by messengers shall be stricken from the roll of churches, unless satisfactory reasons for such failure are given.

Section 4. The association shall withdraw fellowship from any church in its membership which shall be found to be disorderly in faith and practice, but not until written charges are brought against it, which charges shall have been authorized by the official act of the church offering the same. Thereafter, any such charges shall be carefully considered by the association.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. The officers of the association shall consist of a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Director of Music Ministry, School of Christian Studies Director, Director of Evangelism, Librarian and Representatives for the following BIBLICAL RECORDER, Baptist Hospital, Children's Homes, Homes for Aging, Christian Higher Education, Annuity Board, American Bible Society, Home Missions, State Missions and Foreign Missions. These shall be elected annually on the second day of the annual session before the noon recess adjournment by a majority of the members voting and shall begin their term of office upon final adjournment of the session at which elected and shall continue in office until the close of the next annual session. Any officer may succeed himself, except the Moderator, who may not serve more than two years in succession.

The Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director and Director of Evangelism, will be elected at the Executive Committee Meeting in August. After their election they will become a part of the Nominating Committee.

Section 2. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint all commit-

tees not otherwise provided for, and exercise all other duties of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. He shall also, as far as his private duties may permit, visit and communicate with the churches between the sessions of the association to encourage and assist them in their work for the kingdom. He shall appoint a Nominating Committee and Committee on Committees at the annual meeting to serve for the following year. He shall be chairman of the Executive Committee and ex officio member of all other committees.

Section 3. The Vice-Moderator shall discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence, or at his request, and be Vice Chairman of the Executive Committee.

Section 4. The Clerk shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the association; shall superintend their printing and distribution to the churches; shall send one copy each to the General Secretary of the Baptist State Convention, the Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn., the American Baptist Publication Society, Philadelphia, Pa., and to our denominational agencies or institutions requesting them; shall preserve a file of all association records; shall provide at least one month prior to the annual session of the association, form letters for the use of the churches in making their reports to the association and shall suggest to each church, based on the actual cost of printing, the amount needed for the printing and distribution of the Annual. He shall serve as Secretary of the Executive Committee.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all funds of the association, as directed by the association, and make an itemized statement at each annual session.

Section 6. The Historian, in his sole discretion, shall collect facts of interest to the association and the cooperating churches, and shall make a report to each annual session of the association.

Section 7. The Trustees shall be three in number. It shall be their duty to hold in trust any property, endowment or other securities of this association, and to be representative of the association in legal matters.

ARTICLE V—COMMITTEES AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. At each annual session of the association the Moderator shall appoint a Nominating Committee composed of three members from as many different churches. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate and present to the association at its next annual session a complete slate of officers and institutional representatives. After presentation of these nominations the Moderator shall give opportunity for nominations from the floor for any and all of these positions. Should vacancies occur by death or resignation, it shall be the duty of this committee to name a person to fill the vacant position until the next annual session of the association, with the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. At each annual session of the association, the moderator shall appoint a Committee on Committees composed of seven members from as many different churches. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate and present to the association at its next annual session, members of all standing committees not otherwise provided for in this constitution. Should vacancies occur by death or resignation, it shall be the duty of this committee to name a person to fill the vacant position until the next annual session of the association, with the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE shall consist of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Sunday School Director, Associational Church Training Director, Director of Music Ministry, Associational W.M.U. Director, Associational Brotherhood Director and all the pastors of churches within the association together with one member from each church to be elected by the church. A quorum shall consist of ten (10) members of the committee, including four of the above mentioned officers, providing that either the Moderator or the Vice-Moderator is present. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to cooperate with the Baptist State Convention and with the churches of the association in the promotion of any plans which may seem wise for the extension of Christ's kingdom, and to take such steps as may be necessary to put into successful operation any plans adopted by the association. The committee shall meet at least once each quarter at a time to be agreed upon or at the call of the Moderator. The officers of the association shall be the officers of this committee with the Moderator serving as chairman.

Section 4. THE ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of the associational Sunday School Director, the associational Church Training Director, the associational Director of Music Ministry, the associational W.M.U. Director, the associational Brotherhood Director and three pastors, who along with the chairman, shall be nominated by

the Committee on Committees. It shall be the duty of this committee to cooperate with the associational Director of Missions in the extension of Baptist work throughout the associational area, and advise with him in matters pertaining to his work and activities. It shall also be the duty of the committee, in the event of a vacancy in the position of associational Director of Missions, to seek out and recommend to the Executive Committee or the association, a suitable person. It shall be the further duty of this committee to consult with the Finance Committee on matters of expense and to provide information to the Baptist State Convention officials which might be helpful in meeting missionary needs and to make recommendations to the association in matters of this kind.

Section 5. THE FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members with the Treasurer serving as ex officio member. It shall be the duty of this committee to plan and recommend to the Executive Committee and the association a financial budget for the coming year and to supervise the raising and expenditure of funds.

Section 6. THE COMMITTEE ON NEW CHURCHES shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to receive applications from churches seeking admission to the association and, after a visit to such churches, careful investigation and deliberation, to report to the association on such applications in keeping with the provisions of this constitution.

Section 7. THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to study and recommend any necessary change in the constitution and bring reports as necessary to the association.

Section 8. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to arrange the program for the annual session of the association and present the same for adoption at its opening session. The Moderator and Director of Missions will serve as special advisors on this committee.

Section 9. PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to receive or solicit invitations for the place of meeting and to recommend to the annual session a place or places of meeting, preacher, and an alternate for such sermons or sermon to be presented in the discretion of the committee and the dates for the next annual session.

Section 10. THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to study and report on such resolutions as may be referred to it and to present such other resolutions as may be appropriate at the annual session.

Section 11. THE COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL SERVICE AND CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS shall be composed of three members from as many different churches whose duty it shall be to study the social and civic problems of our area, along with relevant literature available through the Christian Life Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention, and to report to the annual session of the association their findings along with recommendations for specific action by the association and/or cooperating churches.

Section 12. THE STEWARDSHIP AND COOPERATIVE PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duties it shall be to encourage each church to teach and practice Bible stewardship, to give to associational missions, and to support world mission causes through the Cooperative Program.

Section 13. THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM, composed of three members shall promote the work of evangelism in the association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the association or its Executive Committee.

Section 14. THE CALENDAR COMMITTEE shall be composed of the following associational officers: Director of Missions, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, W.M.U. Director, Brotherhood Director, Director of Music Ministry, and president of the Minister's Conference. This committee shall prepare an associational calendar for the year, and present same to the annual meeting, for adoption. This calendar shall be included in the annual.

Section 15. THE COMMITTEE ON ORDINATION, composed of seven ministers, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of candidates for the Gospel Ministry. Churches wishing to ordain ministers are requested to place their candidates before the committee at least thirty (30) days prior to the date set for ordination for examination on the following principles:

- a. Christian experience or conversion
- b. Call to the ministry
- c. Attitude toward denominational work and objects
- d. Support of denominational causes

- e. Moral and spiritual fitness
- f. Doctrinal beliefs
- g. Knowledge of the Bible

Candidates are to be ordained with the assistance of this committee only when they are serving a church or churches as pastor or having been called as pastor of a Baptist church of like faith and practice with those member churches of this association.

No candidate for ordination shall be considered by the committee who has not been a member of a cooperating church for at least one year.

Candidates are to be urged to prepare themselves for the ministry as far as possible in Baptist Institutions of Higher Learning.

This committee shall not recommend any candidate for ordination whom they feel will not bring honor and esteem to the Lord, to Southern Baptists and to the BRUSHY Mountain Baptist Association.

Recommendations will be made by the committee to the church where the candidate holds membership. The committee will assist the church in the ordination service at a time convenient to the church and to the members of the committee if such assistance is desired.

Section 16. THE COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS, composed of three members, shall bring a report at the annual meeting, leading in a memorial service, in memory of those reported by the churches as deceased since the last annual meeting.

Section 17. PROPERTIES COMMITTEE. This committee shall be composed of three members and shall have the responsibility of supervision of all properties belonging to the association and shall give attention to the condition of the properties owned by the association. This committee shall make such repairs or improvements as deemed necessary. All matters of major repairs or improvements shall be referred to the Finance Committee for action and recommendation to the Executive Committee. This committee shall make at least one inspection in each quarter of the year of all properties owned by the association.

ARTICLE VI—GENERAL PROVISIONS

Section 1. The employment of a Director of Missions shall follow the procedure outlined in Section 4, Article V, with the understanding that said person be extended an indefinite call and that a period of 30 days notice be given by either the missionary or the association in the event of termination of such employment.

Section 2. The Director of Missions, under the supervision of the Associational Missions Committee, shall be empowered to procure and supervise such necessary secretarial and janitorial personnel for the proper operation and maintenance of the associational office, provided that funds for the hiring and salary of such personnel have been included within the current year's budget.

Section 3. All questions of order not herein provided for shall be decided according to ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER, Revised.

Section 4. Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any annual session upon vote of two-thirds of the members present, provided that such amendments be presented on the first day of the annual session and voted upon the second day.

Section 5. ROTATING OF COMMITTEES. One-third of each committee shall be elected to serve a period of three years. Committees or parts of committees, composed of organizational heads shall not be subject to rotation. No member shall succeed himself. Vacancies occurring during the year may be filled immediately by the Executive Committee.

Section 6. SPECIAL ADVISORS. The Moderator and Director of Missions will serve on all committees of the association as special advisors.

Bylaws

1. The association shall convene annually on the first Monday in October and continue through the first Tuesday in October or longer in the judgment of the Committee on Order of Business and subject to the approval of the association.

2. Each session of the association shall be opened with religious exercise, conducted by whomsoever the Committee on Order of Business may designate.

3. A majority of the members present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of any business except the matter of making changes in the Constitution.

4. Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator, shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration, and avoid the use of unnecessary personalities.

5. The members shall observe toward the officers and towards one another such courtesies as are becoming to Christians.

6. The annual associational year, for the purpose of reporting statistical information shall be September 1 to August 31, inclusive.

7. Amendments to the By-Laws may be made by a majority vote of members present at any annual meeting of the association.

ONE HUNDRED SIXTH ANNUAL MEETING

1. The 106th Annual Meeting of the Brushy Mountain was called to order by the Moderator, Paul Shoupe, at 4 p.m. on Monday, October 3, 1977 at Hinshaw Street Baptist Church.

Mrs. Priscilla Call led the congregation in singing "We're Marching To Zion."

2. Frank Blevins, pastor at Hinshaw Street Church, extended a welcome and led the devotional period using scripture from I Thessalonians 1:1-10.

3. The Report of the Committee on Order of Business was presented by Sherrill Wellborn and adopted.

4. New pastors welcomed to the association included: David R. Testerman, Stony Hill Church and John A. Foster, North Wilkesboro Second Church.

5. The Moderator appointed a Nominating Committee made up of Rex Shumate, Chairman—Edgewood Church, Claude Miller—Hinshaw Street, and Charlie Pool—Moravian Falls Church.

6. The Committee on Committees was appointed by the Moderator as follows: Mrs. Douglas Wood—Lewis Fork, Lawrence G. Critcher—Moravian Falls, Howard Frazier—Hinshaw Street, John Leek—Cub Creek, Mrs. Gwyn Church—Oakwoods, Charles W. Profit—Goshen and Richard F. Wingler—Liberty Grove Church.

7. The Nominating Committee Report, page 1 BOR, was presented by Sherrill Wellborn and all nominations were accepted.

8. The Committee on Committees Report, page 3 BOR, was given by Clinton Eller and adopted.

9. The Properties Committee Report, page 11 BOR, was presented by Bill McKinney for Clyde Bumgarner and adopted.

10. The Report of the Committee on the Dedication of the Annual, page 21 BOR, was adopted as read by N. C. Teague.

11. The Executive Committee Report beginning on page 4 BOR, was presented by Paul Shoupe and adopted. Mr. Shoupe noted that the August meeting was not held as scheduled due to the lack of members present.

12. The History of Hinshaw Street Church was presented by Mrs. W. K. Sturdivant and adopted as printed on page 26 BOR. Bill McKinney suggested that since not many people keep copies of the minutes, would the churches like to have highlights from the foundation of the church included in the church histories instead of information from the last time the church history was written in the minutes as has previously been done?

13. The Historical Events of the Churches, page 30 BOR, was read by Norma Jean Wood and adopted after one correction.

14. Miscellaneous Business

A. A motion was made by Carl Elledge, seconded by Bill Rogers, that since the association has purchased property for a camp, the Nominating Committee should be directed to select three persons to serve as a camp committee and present the names of at the next Executive Committee meeting. The purpose of the rotating committee would be to formulate a development plan for the use of the property, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee. The motion carried.

B. It was decided by common consent agreement that the Constitution Committee be asked to write further guidelines for the Camp Property Committee.

C. Bill McKinney made a motion to adopt the following changes in the Nominating Committee Report: The Moderator is to be Al Andrews instead of Paul Shoupe and Vice-Moderator is to be James Weaver instead of Bill Cardwell.

15. The congregation joined in the singing of the hymn "I Know Whom I Have Believed."

16. Associational Music Director E. E. Sloan presented Mrs. Fred McCall who sang "At The River."

17. In his Director of Missions message Bill McKinney expressed his appreciation for the warm reception he has received in the churches. 23. The Foreign Mission Report, page 18 BOR, was adopted as presented by Mrs. Rena Spicer who spoke to the report, recommending Commission magazine and reminding of the November study of the book "Rivers of Ink" and the December Week of Prayer for Foreign Missions.

24. The Home Missions Report was adopted as printed on page 16 BOR. Bill McKinney spoke to the report noting the decline in baptisms for the first time in six years.

25. Hunter Church spoke to the State Missions Report which was approved as printed on page 19 BOR.

26. The Associational Missions Report, page 16 BOR, was adopted as given by Bill Rogers who spoke to the report.

27. A Cooperative Program feature was given with puppetry by Phil Stone and Tripp May.

28. The hymn "Tell Me The Story of Jesus" was led by Frank Blevins with Ed Reck at the organ.

29. Special Music was provided by the Wilkesboro Church Youth Group directed by Phil Stone.

30. Director of Missions Bill McKinney introduced the speaker for the evening, Dr. Cecil Ray, General Secretary of the N. C. Baptist State Convention.

31. The meeting was adjourned until Tuesday at 9 a.m.

SECOND DAY

32. The second day of the 106th Annual Meeting of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator, Paul Shoupe, at 9 a.m. on Tuesday, October 4, 1977 at Welcome Home Baptist Church.

51. Mrs. W. K. Sturdivant moved the adoption of The Homes For the Aging Report, page 17 BOR. The motion passed and Ralph Cannon spoke to the report noting that 238 people are now cared for in N. C. Baptist Homes and reminding of the associational goal to raise \$1.00 per church member over a three year period beginning in 1976.
52. The Children's Home Report, page 13 BOR, was approved as presented by Horace Moree. Clyde Morris spoke to the report.
53. M. M. Goss spoke to the Baptist Hospital Report in the absence of Calvin Knight.
54. Break
55. The hymn "Am I a Soldier of the Cross" was led by Carl Elledge with Ellihu Sloan at the piano.
56. The Christian Higher Education Report, page 12 BOR, was approved as presented by Bill Rogers who introduced Bob Abrams, Director of Church Relations at Gardner-Webb College, to speak to the report. Mr. Abrams shared the time with Henry Stokes, Director of Church Relations at Wake Forest University.
57. J. C. Shaw presented the BIBLICAL RECORDER Report which was adopted as printed on page 24 BOR, and introduced Woodrow Hill from the RECORDER staff to speak to the report.
58. The Baptist Foundation Report was adopted as printed on page 22 BOR. Gordon Mad-drey spoke to the report.
59. The Annuity Board Report, page 23 BOR, was given by Clyde Church and adopted. Sam O'Neal spoke to the report.

The wheelchair victims and aging people asked that churches build ramps to let them enter the church more easily.

LITTLE ROCK—Finished the third and last phase of renovation of sanctuary, nineteen young people spent a week at the Baptist Assembly Camp Caswell, Mr. Darrel Poole at Southeastern Seminary.

MILLERS CREEK—Purchased new folding machine and mimeograph machine, put new paint on sanctuary inside and out, redecorated church foyer, ten youth missionaries were commissioned to serve during the month of August.

MOUNT CARMEL—Installed air conditioner, carpeted two Sunday School rooms, started RA,

GA, and Acteens organizations.
 MOUNT PLEASANT—Renovated for Choir Room, made improvements in the parsonage.
 NORTH WILKESBORO, SECOND—Began visitation program.
 OAK GROVE—Began remodeling of church.
 PLEASANT HOME—Organized GAs, Acteens, and Youth Choir. Paved parking lot.
 ROARING RIVER—Received a gift of a copy machine, a permanent arrangement of flowers was placed in the church in memory of Lawrence Staley.
 SHADY GROVE—Painted sanctuary, built shelter over picnic table.
 WALNUT GROVE—Established trust fund for cemetery.
 WELCOME HOME—Church purchased a bus for use in religious activities.

HISTORY OF HINSHAW STREET BAPTIST CHURCH

A Presbytery composed of the Rev. J. C. Pruitt, Deacons C. H. Dancy, I. S. Baity, and J. W. Porter, met in the home of C. H. Dancy on March 19, 1927 and organized Hinshaw Street Missionary Baptist Church. Charter members were: Rev. J. C. Pruitt, Mrs. J. C. Pruitt, Clarence Pruitt, Ruth Pruitt, C. H. Dancy, Mrs. C. H. Dancy, Minnie Elledge, Butrice Hawkins, Ila Fairchilds, L. S. Baity, George Moore, Mrs. George Moore, W. H. Moore, Mrs. W. H. Moore, Hessie Moore, A. E. Chambers, Mrs. A. E. Chambers, Clyde Chambers, Arvil Chambers, Addie Reeves, Lee Shepherd, Howard Johnson, Mrs. Howard Johnson, H. J. Byrd, W. L. Byrd, Mrs. W. L. Byrd, J. W. Porter, Mrs. J. W. Porter, and Enoch Griffin.

After the adoption of the Covenant, Articles of Faith and Resolutions the church appointed the following as a building committee: I. S. Baity, John Wilson, C. H. Dancy, and A. E. Chambers. After appointing the building committee, I. S. Baity and wife donated a lot on which the present building stands. The church proceeded immediately to erect a building thirty by fifty feet. This building consisted of four rooms and a sanctuary. On June 12, 1927 the church held its first service in the building.

In November, 1947 they borrowed \$10,000, added eight rooms and restrooms to the old building, and had it brick veneered, which makes a total of twelve rooms in the building. At the June meeting, in 1959, the board of trustees was given permission to purchase the community store house and lot at the price of \$9,500 which was renovated immediately and added 14 rooms and two assembly halls for Sunday School. At the September meeting, in 1959, the church voted to purchase a heating plant of the B & R. Sheet Metal Company at the price of \$860.00, which heats all the annex.

At the November meeting, in 1959, the church voted to purchase the Joe Canter property located at 224 "C" Street for \$8,500.00 for a pastorium. A carport and utility room, built by some of the men of the church were added to the pastorium.

At the December 1959 meeting the church accepted the resignation of all the deacons, and upon recommendation of the deacons, the rotating system was begun.

At the December 6, 1960 meeting of a planning committee was appointed to secure plans and estimates of cost for an addition to the building. The church purchased the lot on the west side of the present property.

April 25, 1962 a motion was made, and carried favorably, to have the planning committee secure plans for a three story educational building to be erected on the lot purchased on the west side of the church. These plans were adopted September 23, 1962.

In the late fall of 1961 the church, by common consent, set the date of March 1, 1962 as pay-off day on the annex property. This goal was attained and the church became debt free on March 12, 1962.

The following have served as pastor: The Rev. J. C. Pruitt, Rev. L. B. Murray, Rev. J. E. Hayes, Rev. D. C. Clanton, Rev. W. N. Hayes, Rev. Hubert Bullis, Rev. Richard Day, Rev. W. S. Luck, Rev. Clete W. Simmons, and the Rev. Warren E. Kerr.

The above information was written in 1962 by Mr. J. F. Jordan. During the fifteen year period of history in Hinshaw Street Baptist Church since 1962 the following ministers are listed as serving: The Rev. Harold Smith 1959-65; Dr. W. L. Pitts 1965-68 and the Rev. D. Frank Blevins, Jr. 1975 and now serving. Mr. Edward Reck was called in March 1977 as associate pastor.

On September 23, 1962 the church voted to have the planning committee secure plans and erect a three story educational building with location on the west side of the church. The ground breaking ceremony for this building was held March 31, 1963 at 12 o'clock. The Rev. J. C. Pruitt, charter member, and first pastor moved the first shovel of dirt. The building was completed in February 1964 at the cost of \$112,579.00. On February 23, 1964 the first service

was held in the new building.

During these years changes were made with the parsonage. The parsonage located at 224-C St., North Wilkesboro was sold and another parsonage was purchased in the location of Sherwood Forest. In 1976 a parsonage was purchased at 905 Coffey Avenue, Finley Park, North Wilkesboro.

June 8, 1973 brought rejoicing because the educational building that was constructed in 1963, after making the last payment was free of debt.

On March 19, 1977 Hinshaw Street celebrated her golden anniversary of 50 years. They observed this day with a morning worship service, a fellowship meal at 12:30 o'clock, and a 2:30 o'clock anniversary service in the afternoon.

The current membership at Hinshaw is 581. Gifts received by the church for the current year were \$85,100.00.

HISTORY OF WELCOME HOME BAPTIST CHURCH

Owing to the great number of new homes being built in the triangular area lying south of the Klondike road and East of Highway No. 421 and taking into consideration the rapid growth of new homes along the Boone Trail in this vicinity, realizing the spiritual needs of these good people and being deeply aware of spiritual and social blessings derived from consecrated church work, a number of brethren led by a spirit of devotion and love of divine worship called several meetings at Cricket school building for the purpose of organizing a new church to meet the growing demand of this fast expanding community.

Sunday School was conducted in the school building during the summer of 1936, with growing interest each Sunday. On Wednesday evening of September 16, 1936, at 7:30 p.m. a number of Baptist brethren and sisters met in the school building for the purpose of organizing the church.

A Presbytery composed of Rev. J. E. Hayes, A. B. Hayes, and D. A. Adams assisted by Deacons W. M. Carson and George Osborne of Gordon Baptist Church proceeded to organize a church.

After the church was organized the Presbytery called for letters of those wishing to join. There were thirty-two persons who came forward with letters as follows: Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Beshears, Mrs. Edith Beshears Huffman, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Brookshire, Mr. W. H. Hurley, Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Jones, Mrs. Clella Mae Jones Haynes, Mr. D. B. Holman, Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Kendall, Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Keys, the late Mr. and Mrs. Frank Lankford, Dewie Lankford Beshears, Mrs. Wesley Griffin, Gladys Lankford Church, Warren Lankford, Mr. S. E. Lankford, Mr. and Mrs. G. L. Michael, Mr. and Mrs. Sherman Shumate, Mr. and Mrs. M. W. Snider, Mr. and Mrs. Lester Waddell, Rudd and Thelma Waddell and Mrs. J. W. Snider. After these letters were read and approved by the Presbytery, they were accepted as members of the new church which was to be known as "Welcome Home Missionary Baptist Church."

The next item of business was to elect a clerk and after some discussion the church unanimously elected W. H. Hurley. The next order of business was to elect Deacons. After some deliberation the church named Brother H. R. Kendall and wife, Brother Sherman Shumate and wife as deacons and deaconesses to serve with Brother J. E. Brookshire and wife who joined as Deacons. On October 4, 1936 Rev. Levi Green was elected first pastor.

A building committee was appointed and met at the office of Cardwell Lumber Company, Monday, October 5, 1936 at 4 o'clock p.m. for the purpose of purchasing lumber to erect a church building. This committee kept moving on with the work and by the last Sunday in December 1936 enough of the building was completed to hold Sunday School in it and the second Sunday in January 1937 the first preaching service was held in it and in a short time the building was completed and dedicated on October 19, 1938 on the present location.

Again in 1949 a building program was started. There were eight Sunday School rooms and a baptistry added to the building. New pews were purchased and a heating system installed, which makes all the rooms and the sanctuary comfortable. The outside of the building was brick veneered. All this was completed at a cost of \$11,935.00 paid for and the church was out of debt. On August 29, 1936, Clyde Michael and wife Mary deeded 3.3 acres of land to the church, recorded in Book, 176-482 p.p.

One thing is noted in the minutes of this church that has not been in the minutes of any other church. All the minutes from the beginning of the church give the passage of scripture that the pastor uses for his text, and then the clerk comments on the inspiring and spiritual message that was brought by the pastor.

At the September meeting in 1939 the church voted to join the association and sent as its first messengers Ural Sebastain, J. F. Lankford and W. H. Hurley.

It has had pastors as follows: Rev. Levi Green, October 1936-1938; Rev. A. W. Eller, 1938-41; Rec. C. J. Poole, 1945-47; Rev. Richard Day, 1947-49; then without a pastor until December 1949 when Rev. Harvey White was elected.

April 9, 1938 George Osborne joined as a deacon and in Feb. 1940 he was ordained as a minister. In May 1951 Leonard Michael, Bill Link, Coiet Dyer, and Bob Church were ordained as deacons.

The above information was written by Mr. J. F. Jordan in 1955. The ministers who have served since that time are listed as follows: The Rev. Harvey White, 1949-59; The Rev. Vaughn Brown, 1959-62; The Rev. Hunter Church, 1963-69; The Rev. Dean Simpson, 1969-72; The Rev. Tommy Privette, 1972-73; The Rev. Carl Elledge 1973-now serving.

In 1960 the church voted to proceed with construction of a new educational building. The cost of the building was \$27,324.00. In August 1967 the church finished paying for the building.

In 1975 a very attractive Church Directory was printed containing pictures of the minister, the deacons, the officers and the church members with families and addresses. The outside covers were scenes of the church buildings and grounds and the church sanctuary.

In 1976 the church steeple was added to the main church building.

Present membership of the church is 371. Current church officers as listed:

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Brushy Mountain Baptist Association Executive Committee met November 1 at Wilkesboro Baptist Church with 24 people present representing 12 churches. Various organizational reports were given:

SUNDAY SCHOOL Director Bryce Greene reported that he had visited six churches at this point and announced a planning meeting on November 2.

CHURCH TRAINING—Plans were announced for "M" Night which was held on Nov. 22 at Oakwoods Church.

MISSIONS COMMITTEE—Bill Rogers, chairman, brought a recommendation from that committee that application be made for state aid in the amount of \$1000.00. It was further re-

commended that a letter accompany the application stating that the Brushy Mountain Association does not wish to receive aid at the expense of an association where the need is greater. The motion, seconded by Frank Blevins, passed.

Bill McKinney, Director of Missions, spoke concerning the "Bold Mission Thrust" emphasis—an effort to (1) evangelize and (2) congregationalize (that is, to provide the opportunity for every person to worship in a Baptist church). This effort to be carried out both locally and in certain target areas of the country where the Baptist witness is weak.

Mr. McKinney also announced plans for an "Equipping Conference" for church workers to be held in March and asked for suggestions for areas of interest to be covered.

The second meeting of the Executive Committee was on February 14 at Wilkesboro Church with 19 people representing 15 churches. The minutes were read and approved. The treasurer's report showed a balance in the checking account of \$2,499.23 and the amount in the savings account \$10,175.57. It was announced that the State Missions Committee had granted the request for financial aid in the amount of \$996.00 for 1977.

Organizational Reports included:

SUNDAY SCHOOL—Director Bryce Greene reported that he had now visited in 35 churches and plans are being made for the Sunday School Leadership Training Conference to be held in March.

CHURCH TRAINING—Director Carl Elledge reported that the attendance at "M" Night held in November was 208, the largest in several years.

WMU—Bill McKinney, for Director Lillian Foster, announced that the annual meeting of the Brushy Mountain Association WMU will be a supper meeting, to which Baptist Men are also invited, on April 25 at Wilkesboro Church with a missionary speaker.

BROTHERHOOD—Director Max Freeman is leaving on Feb. 15 on a mission project to help in the construction of a church building on the island of Barbados.

VBS—Bill McKinney, for Director Phil Stone, announced that the VBS Early Planning Clinic will be held on March 14 and the VBS Clinics on April 21-22.

MISSIONS COMMITTEE—Chairman Bill Rogers announced that the Missions Committee will be having monthly meetings and is considering prison ministry, rest home and resort area ministries.

Director of Missions Bill McKinney made the following announcements:

1. Brushy Mountain Association's representative to the General Board of the Baptist State Convention, the Rev. E. W. McMurray, will rotate off the board at the end of 1977. The association is asked to submit to the Nominating Committee of the General Board names and biographical sketches of two pastors and two laypersons (men or women) as recommendations to replace Mr. McMurray.

ACTION TAKEN: A motion was made by I. V. Couch, seconded by Gwyn Blackburn, that the Missions Committee choose four people to recommend as General Board representatives. The motion carried. Carl Elledge suggested that a letter be sent to each church asking that suggestions be sent to the Missions Committee. It was further decided that the matter of how to choose recommendations for General Board representatives be referred to the Constitution Committee for possible constitutional amendment.

2. The Missions Committee had discussed the possibility of having a World Missions Conference in 1979.

ACTION TAKEN: Gwyn Blackburn made a motion that the association have a World Missions Conference in 1979. Bill Rogers seconded and the motion passed.

The Properties Committee was authorized to hire an office custodian to replace Mr. Paul Hudler who passed away recently. The Nominating Committee is asked to replace Mr. Hudler on the Properties Committee.

I. V. Couch made a motion that the associational office be carpeted for more warmth. The Properties Committee is also in the process of having the diffusers on the heating vents replaced to provide more heat.

Gwyn Blackburn suggested that in view of the Director of Missions' plans for attending several conventions and conferences, the amount of money allotted in the budget for these meetings might not be sufficient. Gene Frady made a motion, seconded by Bill Rogers, that money from the Miscellaneous Fund be used to supplement the Conventions and Conferences Fund. The motion was unanimously passed.

The Executive Committee next met on May 2, at Wilkesboro Church with 20 people representing 12 churches. The moderator, the Rev. Paul Shoupe, called the meeting to order and brought a devotional thought from Phil. 4:8-9. J. C. Shaw led in prayer.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Organizational Reports given included:

1. Sunday School—Director Bryce Greene reported that he had now visited in all 41 churches of the association this year.

2. Brotherhood—Director Max Freeman announced the Men and Boys Overnight Camp on May 13-14 and that he would do a program on his missionary trip to Barbados for any church so desiring.

3. WMU—Director Lillian Foster reported a successful WMU Annual Meeting with the Boys and Girls 3rd Grade Day Camp scheduled for May 21.

4. VBS—Bill McKinney, reported for Director Phil Stone that although the association had an excellently trained and prepared VBS Team, fewer than 75 people availed themselves of the VBS Clinics.

The Director of Missions reported that he had received no response from churches to the letter asking for recommendations for a General Board Representative so the Missions Committee chose four people and sent biographical information to the nominating committee. No notification has been received as to which of the four has been accepted.

Missions Committee chairman, Bill Rogers brought several recommendations from the Missions Committee:

1. The World Missions Conference for 1979 has been confirmed. Mr. Rogers made a motion that the recommendation from the Baptist State Convention that one missionary be brought in from the far west (even though it would be more expensive) be accepted. The motion was seconded by Frank Blevins and carried.

2. The Missions Committee recommends (Motion by Mr. Rogers) the purchase of an electronic stencil cutter at a cost of \$900.00 for the associational office. Al Andrews seconded and the motion passed.

3. The Missions Committee has discussed the possibility of buying property suitable for use by all churches in the association for retreats, camping, etc. Mr. Rogers asked for the feelings and comments of Executive Committee members as to whether or not to proceed with the matter. Max Freeman stated that the National Guard had promised use of their machinery in developing such property. Frank Blevins made a motion that the Missions Committee be given authorization to study the possibilities of such properties and bring back propositions and prices for consideration to the next meeting. E. W. McMurray seconded and motion.

Gwyn Blackburn moved that the stated motion be amended to give the Missions Committee and Trustees authorization to take an option on such a property. E. W. McMurray seconded, and the motion, as amended, passed.

Director of Missions Bill McKinney brought several items for discussion:

1. Mr. and Mrs. Conrad Carlton have been hired as custodians for the associational office. Heat diffusers have been replaced, improving the heating situation at the office and the Properties Committee has purchased but not yet installed carpeting.

2. There will be a State Missions Offering Interpretors meeting on May 14 in Greensboro.

3. Dr. Charles Treadway is available on a "first come, first served" basis to ten associations for a Deaconship School. Al Andrews made a motion that the association request such a school, J. C. Shaw seconded, and the motion carried.

4. Mr. McKinney reported that there has been little response from churches concerning the planned summer Reservoir Ministry. An Orientation Meeting will be held on May 15 for all volunteers.

On May 31, 1977 the Executive Committee met in a CALLED session to discuss the possibility of purchasing property for use as a camp and retreat area. There were 30 people present, representing 16 churches.

The moderator, the Rev. Paul Shoupe called the meeting to order and, after devotions, recognized Bill Rogers, chairman of the Missions Committee. Mr. Rogers announced that, according to the authority given the Missions Committee at the last Executive Committee meeting, the Missions Committee had found and taken an option on 18.03 acres of property in the Mulberry Community. The \$200 option was paid and expires on June 6. A survey has been made and the cost included in the purchased price of \$11,300.

Carl Elledge presented slides showing several different views of the property.

Terry Bunn presented aerial photographs and discussed information regarding the appropriateness of the property.

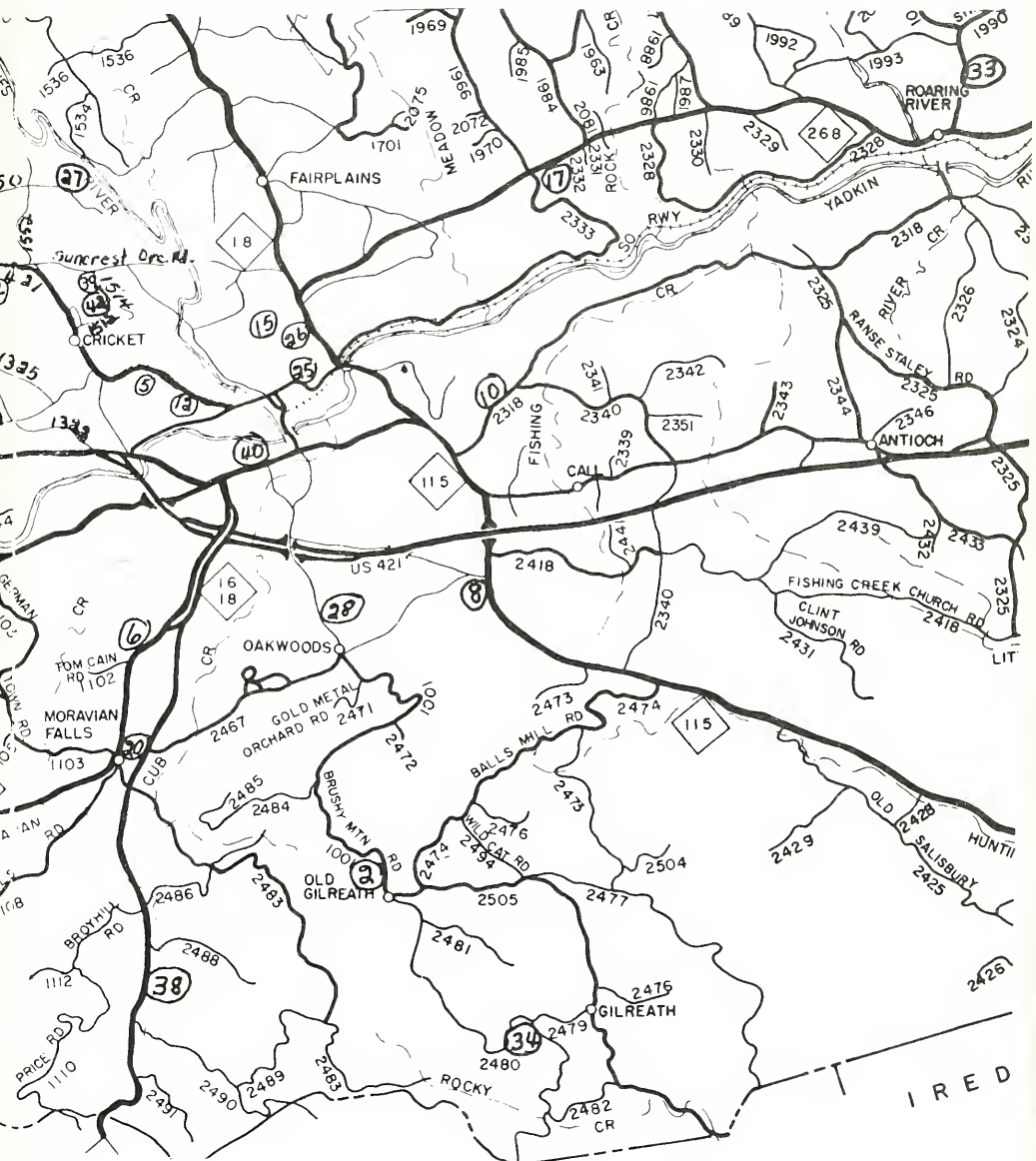
The treasurer reported funds on hand of \$1,841.62 in checking account, \$10,309.12 in savings account and one outstanding bill of \$970.02.

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

Charged with the task of developing and implementing the missions strategy of our association, your Missions Committee began meeting monthly last Fall to try to identify needs and establish priorities in our missions effort. We surveyed several possible mission opportunities including area Nursing Homes, the prison unit, and Resort Ministries. Dr. William McKinney worked closely with us and his counsel and insight were extremely helpful.

In addition to regularly scheduled programs such as the Day Camp and the Weekend camping experience for our men and boys, the committee gave serious consideration to developing a resort ministry at the W. Kerr Scott Dam & Reservoir. Several churches participated in this effort. The number of campers participating each weekend was very disappointing and we are presently reviewing the ministry to see if it should be continued next summer.

Perhaps the major item on our agenda this past year was the search for a retreat and camping center for the association. At the request of the Executive Council, the Missions Committee studied the need for such a facility and began investigating various tracts of land in the area. A suitable tract was found and recommended to the Executive Council. The decision was made to purchase the property. We are excited about the potential ministry in our new retreat center and feel it will add an important dimension to the life and work of the association.

As we face a new year, your Missions Committee would remind you of the special "Bold Mission Thrust" emphasis for 1977-79. There are two basic objectives: (1) to let every person in our association have an opportunity to hear and accept the Gospel of Jesus Christ and (2) to encourage every person to share in the witness and ministry of a New Testament fellowship of believers. It is important that each church share a Bold Mission Vision. Jesus said, "as the Father hath sent me, so send I you." We call upon every Christian in the Brushy Mountain Association to take this mandate of our Lord seriously. The fields around us are indeed "white unto harvest."

GENERAL BOARD REPORT

Between sessions of the Baptist State Convention, the General Board has charge and control of all work of the Convention except the activities designated to the Boards of Trustees of its institutions and agencies. It is composed of one member from associations with less than 20,000 membership; two members from associations with memberships of 20,000-40,000; three members from associations with more than 40,000 membership and one from each of the ten regions.

The General Board meets three times a year: at Raleigh in January, on a college campus in June or July, and at Caraway in October. In cases of emergency, other meetings could be called.

Officers of the Board are President, Vice-President and Recording Secretary. Each member of the Board is given a choice of the committee through which he will serve. The committees are: Council of Christian Life, Christian Higher Education, Evangelism, Church Programs, Missions and Social Services. For the sake of efficiency, from these committees are formed many

sub-committees. Your Brushy Mountain member this past year was privileged to serve on the Missions Committee. He attended the January meeting of the Board and the Missions Committee at the Baptist Building in Raleigh. The October meeting shall be held at Camp Caraway on October 11-12.

All board members are sent copies of Executive Committee Minutes. A policy of openness is practiced by the General Board. All minutes of the Executive Committee and the General Board are kept in an official record book in the Baptist Building and are open for examination by any member of a participating church upon request, and your representative also has these records and minutes.

STATE MISSIONS REPORT

State missions is a variety of people-centered ministries that both strengthen and lengthen the witness of local churches in North Carolina.

State mission ministries helps churches by supplementing pastor's salaries, providing money at low interest rates to buy lots for new churches, sponsoring conferences, workshops, seminars, and retreats, and aiding financially in pastors' retirement programs.

Two-thirds of the money for all home missions projects in this state comes from state missions funds. In fact, there are really no home mission projects in our state. There are only cooperative projects which are co-sponsored and co-financed between the State Mission Ministries Division and the Home Mission Board.

The Cooperative Program and the State Missions Offering in September provide the funds for mission ministries. The State Missions Goal this year is more than three times what it normally is. This increase is to pay off large debts in order that we won't have such large interest payments and payments on principal will not consume funds which should be used for state mission projects. I hope we in the Brushy Mountain Association can raise our share of this goal (\$1,385,000) this year (our goal is \$20,000) so we can do Bold Mission Projects at home and around the world.

I believe one place we need to make improvement is in our missions. I do believe one of the reasons more churches do not cooperate with associational, state, home and foreign missions is the lack of knowledge of what it is all about. If we could encourage the churches to support their pastors better, so they wouldn't have to supplement by other sources and could be encouraged and supported by the church to attend pastor's conferences, associational meetings, state and Southern Baptist Conventions, evangelistic conferences, and other conferences and seminars then you would see more cooperation and more financial support. The place to strengthen is the local church. The strength of world missions depends on the strength of the local church. Strengthen the stakes then lengthen the cords in Bold Missions.

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

During the past year the missionary force of the Home Mission Board increased by 368, the most significant gain in eight years. The 2,492 missionaries were augmented by 1,282 student summer missionaries and 142 short-term Adult Christian Service Corps Volunteers.

Since the report last year the Board has lost eighteen missionaries by death and twenty-three retired at the end of 1976.

There has been outstanding financial support in the past year. Cooperative Program gifts increased 13.65 percent over the previous year. The Board received \$7,680,150 in the basic Cooperative Program allocation, plus challenge funds of \$870,143. The Annie Armstrong Easter Offering totaled \$9,631,012, a gain of 13.46 percent. This increase in funds will enable the Board to enlarge the number of missionaries.

At mid-year the Board joined the Hawaii Baptist Convention in sending the first Southern Baptist Missionaries to American Samoa to begin a new mission work there.

There is a sad note in the report of Evangelism Development. During 1976 the churches reported 384,496 baptisms. This is the first decline in six years, and a matter for concern and prayer.

In the Program of Chaplaincy Ministries, military and civilian chaplains totaled 805.

In the past year the Department of Church Loans gave counsel to approximately 1,300 churches. Loan applications from 249 churches were processed and approved totaling \$12,-968,039.

The Program of Christian Social Ministries assisted the Conventions of Arkansas, Colorado, Louisiana, Mississippi, Oklahoma, Tennessee and Utah-Idaho with \$55,500 to meet disaster relief needs.

Associational Administration Service participated in designing and implementing Bold Mission Thrust training for directors and leaders who will be assisting in this work. Much emphasis is being placed on Bold Mission Thrust with the twin objectives of evangelizing and congregationalizing. The theme for 1976-77 is "Let the Church Stand Up" and the 1978-79 theme is "Let the Church Reach Out."

In connection with Bold Mission Thrust, special attention has been given the Programs of both Personal and Mass Evangelism. May each of us help in these efforts by our prayers, our giving and our personal Christian witness.

FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

For the second year in a row the Foreign Mission Board, during '76-'77 added a record number of new missionary personnel. The appointees included 128 career missionaries, 32 missionary associates, 94 missionary journeymen, 10 reappointments and 4 special projects workers. The total number of foreign missionary personnel is now 2,731 serving in 87 countries.

More than 2,700 Baptist pastors and lay persons from the U. S. and other countries will be taking part during the next two years in at least 38 different countries in evangelistic efforts. Most will come from Southern Baptist Churches in the U. S. They will pay their own transportation to and from the fields to work along side missionaries and National Baptists from one to four weeks.

Volunteers to serve in medical teams ready for immediate activation when disaster strikes overseas include 23 doctors, 3 registered nurses, 7 dentists, a pharmacist, and a surgical assistant. The volunteers, from 16 states are divided into four teams, and are coordinated through the medical consultants office at the Foreign Mission Board. Others are still needed for these teams.

For mass communications facilities and equipment the FMB in January '77 appropriated \$112,000 from the Lottie Moon (76) Christmas offering, \$11,000 for equipment in Peru, \$26,000 for a mass media center in Liberia, and \$75,000 for a Hong Kong communications center.

Relief funds totaling \$368,492 and going to 11 countries were approved by the FMB in April. Also voted were funds to continue "Food for Work" projects in North Brazil, aid to refugees in Thailand, to rebuild church buildings after the earthquake in Romania and to repair a Baptist Theological Seminary building in Bucharest.

For a number of years the FMB has conducted one appointment service each year in a major city. This April such a service was held in Atlanta, Ga. at the request of the Georgia Baptist Convention and the Atlanta Baptist Association. It is hoped that more large cities can accommodate such a magnificent service. (It was my pleasure to see such a service in Memphis, Tenn. in June, 1963 during the 50th Anniversary of G. A. Convention.) The parade of flags of the nations, the singing of a choir with hundreds of voices, the thrilling testimonies of missionaries, and the actual appointment by the Board will present a service long to be remembered.

At the meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in Norfolk, Va. last summer the FMB presented a report on plans for the future under the heading "Total Missions Thrust Now." Ten points were set forth. Some of them being: to have by the year 2000, a 100% increase in missionary personnel serving in at least 125 countries, to vastly increase evangelistic efforts, radio, television and publications, leadership training, and to give accentuated attention through health care, world hunger and disaster.

Dr. Baker James Cauthen, Executive Secretary of the FMB says, "The most important element in Total Missions Thrust is the power of God's Holy Spirit. This becomes a summons to intercessory prayer on the part of all Southern Baptists. Everybody can be involved at the throne of grace. Messengers can be sent, power can be experienced, and harvests can be reaped only through the enabling power of our living Lord, who has given us promise to be with us through the end of the age."

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

Baptists of North Carolina provide a ministry of love and care to children, young people and their families. The program is more than rooms and meals and activities and recreation. The program consists of the following provisions:

- I. **CAMPUSES** at Mills Home, Thomasville; Kennedy Home, Kinston; Odum Home, Pembroke; and Broyhill Home, Waynesville-Clyde continue to serve as centers of service and operation in their respective areas of the state.
- II. **FOSTER HOME CARE**, a state wide program of the Homes, is vital to numbers of children needing special help. Additional foster homes are needed throughout the state. We welcome opportunities to talk with prospective foster parents about this area of service.
- III. **EMERGENCY SHELTERS** at Forest City, Charlotte, Burlington and Henderson are meeting a critical need. They provide a ready resource for children who need help immediately.
- IV. **THE MATERNITY HOME** in Asheville, opened in 1970, has proved to be a much-needed and well-received service. More than three hundred girls have been served from throughout North Carolina and beyond.
- V. **SOCIAL WORK AND FAMILY RESOURCE CENTERS** enable us to work with families in providing services to children, family rehabilitation, family education and preventive services. These centers are located at Waynesville, Asheville, Charlotte, Thomasville, Burlington, Raleigh, Kinston, Fayetteville and Pembroke.
- VI. **THE CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER** on the Mills Home Campus at Thomasville provides a demonstration program for churches who are interested in establishing services for preschool age children in nursery school education, day care and kindergarten.

Members of our staff are anxious to have you and members of your churches visit on any of our campuses. To see, observe and to feel in person what it is like to live in a children's home is to appreciate our child care ministry. Thank you for your dependable support in numerous ways.

HOMES FOR THE AGING REPORT

The past year in your N. C. Baptist Homes for the Aging has been one of the fullest and most exciting in the 26 years that the Homes have been ministering!

Of keenest interest was the ground-breaking service for the new Western North Carolina Baptist Homes, on the Pearson Estate in Northwest Asheville, last October when more than a thousand people from our Western N. C. Baptist Churches, as well as many others throughout the state, were present. Construction is now underway for this lovely Home which will initially accommodate 50 people.

Another exciting venture is the construction of four duplex apartments at the site of the Hayes Home in Winston-Salem. These apartments will care for 16 additional persons and will be ready for occupancy in the fall of 1977. Sixty-six more people will be served in our Baptist Homes family in the next two years.

Gifts from our Baptist people have been very encouraging during the past year through the Cooperative Program and through the third Sunday of February Offering. These sources supply 35% of the total budget of the Homes and are used continually to supplement the care of the majority of the residents who cannot pay their full cost of care. They are love gifts indeed

and are a life-line for those whose needs could not be met without them.

Future plans will call for a greater concern and commitment on our part than ever before. The future of our N. C. Baptist Homes is as bright as the promises of God, and, in that future, the Lord, and these older people in our midst, will be looking to you to share in meeting the needs as we reach out and serve more of these dear ones who desperately need help.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

The beautiful stained glass window in the front of Davis Chapel at Baptist Hospital has three large panels, each depicting an aspect of Christ's ministry: healing, teaching, and preaching. The window serves as a reminder to the staff that Baptist Hospital has also been commissioned to this threefold task.

The hospital's primary task, obviously, is healing and it attempts to obtain and use the best personnel and equipment available for the healing task. The medical staff consists of competent, dedicated men and women in all the various specialties of medicine. Persons with rare and complicated medical problems are referred to Baptist Hospital by their family physicians for treatment. Last year 158,863 visits were made in the hospital's Outpatient Department and the Bowman Gray Department of Clinics. There were 22,365 admissions to the hospital for a total of 193,942 patient days. These patients came from 90 counties in North Carolina, from 29 other states and from three foreign countries.

Baptist Hospital is also involved in teaching. In cooperation with the Bowman Gray School of Medicine of Wake Forest University, it helped to train 1,188 students last year for careers in medicine and allied health fields. In addition, there were 87 graduate students in the basic sciences. The hospital also provided clinical facilities for 483 student nurses from three nearby schools of nursing and for 120 students in other allied schools. The School of Pastoral Care last year enrolled a total of 75 students in various levels of Clinical Pastoral Education.

The hospital also has a preaching ministry. There is preaching in the formal sense at least four times a week in the worship services held in Davis Chapel. In a less formal sense, the Christian Gospel is proclaimed daily by staff, students, patients and others who witness to their faith in word and deed.

In all of these ministries, Baptist Hospital is mindful of its Christian heritage and its strong tie with the Baptist State Convention. This tie is maintained and strengthened through the services of capable, dedicated trustees who are elected by and are responsible to the Convention. The tie is also strengthened through the financial support from the churches; last year \$294,324 was received through the Cooperative Program and \$405,947 through the Mother's Day Offering.

Several members of the hospital staff have assumed active roles in denominational life at the associational level and the state convention level, as well as in their local churches. For the past five years hospital personnel have assisted in Cooperative Program promotion in at least two associations each year. Staff members are pleased to do everything possible to strengthen the denominational tie, believing that this tie adds a dimension to the ministry of healing, teaching and preaching.

Mother's Day gifts for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1977, were \$411,225.56 compared to a total of \$405,946.52 for the preceding fiscal year.

BAPTIST COLLEGES REPORT

Baptists of North Carolina are deeply involved in the ministry of Christian Higher Education through the support of six colleges and one university: Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, Meredith, Wingate and Wake Forest University. During the 1976-77 academic year, 13,733 persons were enrolled in the seven schools. The number graduating in May, 1977 was 2,493.

One strong emphasis of Baptist colleges is the preparation of pastors, missionaries and other church vocation volunteers. In the fall of 1976, there were 846 persons preparing for church-related vocations at North Carolina Baptist Colleges.

The colleges welcome and encourage the help of pastors and laity in urging our Baptist young people to attend a Baptist college. Most of the students presently attending receive some form of financial assistance, thanks to the Father's Day offering.

North Carolina Baptist Colleges continue to be grateful for generous financial support through the Cooperative Program. The colleges reaffirm their support and partnership in missions with the churches, and offer the services of faculty, students and other campus resources to make the Bold Mission emphasis of Southern Baptists a vital and successful ministry.

BIBLICAL RECORDER REPORT

What is perhaps the greatest challenge faced in all the history of Southern Baptists is before our people for the remaining 23 years of the 20th century. It has been called "Bold Missions Thrust," and the success of the venture is yet to be determined. There is no doubt concerning the importance or the motivation for the undertaking, but there is uncertainty as to whether the motivating message will be successfully communicated to some 13 million Southern Baptists, and to our more than 34,000 churches. Without adequate communication channels, the program cannot succeed.

The heart of the program is to evangelize and congregationalize the world's population, and the thrust is confronting all human beings everywhere with the gospel, and affording them the opportunity of knowing and trusting Christ as Saviour, and then leading them to understanding of His lordship.

The program is so big, and the challenge so great, that every Baptist must be involved to make it successful. Not since Jesus presented his disciples the goal of going into all the world has such boldness been demonstrated.

The most difficult problems faced in our churches are related to communications. When people are uninformed, poorly informed, or misinformed, they get into trouble. When they know what is taking place in their local congregation and in the denomination, interest is generated and cooperation results. Openness is therefore important, and the purpose of the BIBLICAL RECORDER is to keep Baptist church members informed concerning involvement in their denomination, and in the Christian world.

In light of developments presently underway in our denomination, it is important that every Baptist church member in North Carolina receive the BIBLICAL RECORDER weekly. Already more than 1100 churches in our state are providing through their budgets for the RECORDER to go to all resident families. The Southern Baptist Convention has adopted a circulation goal of eight million for state papers by 1980. The SBC believes that every Baptist family ought to be receiving its state Baptist paper. RECORDER circulation approaches 120,000 but should be increased in the immediate future to 150,000.

If your church is not sending the RECORDER to resident families at the present time, arrangements should be made immediately to do so by incorporating it in your church budget.

Costing less than half the price of a postage stamp per issue, it is delivered by U. S. Mail directly to your home address.

The RECORDER doesn't cost; it pays! Your church will be a healthier congregation if you provide the RECORDER for your resident families. It is the most widely read piece of literature received by North Carolina Baptists. No investment pays greater dividends.

CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE REPORT

The N. C. Christian Action League has been engaged in a two pronged attack on the moral front during the past year. A real effort has been made to curb the flow of pornography, and the liquor-by-the-drink issue has been opposed at every turn.

In the legislative program of the League a questionnaire was sent to each candidate for the State Senate and the House of Representatives asking for views on the question of the dissemination of hard-core pornographic materials. Another question went so far as to suggest a state-wide vote on the matter of regulating and controlling distribution of pornographic materials.

Senate Bill No. 539 was introduced by Senator I. Beverly Lake, Jr. of Wake County. It is hoped that this law will regulate and eventually do away with hard-core pornography in North Carolina. The bill was amended many times, but the strength of the statute remains intact. This new law will permit the solicitor or the attorney general to proceed against pornography.

Another bill has been enacted that will prohibit the display of pornographic magazines and other materials on racks in public places where they can be viewed by minors. Still another law was passed that will make it illegal to use minors in the production of pornographic materials.

The effort against liquor-by-the-drink began before the election of Senators and Representatives last year. An all out campaign was conducted to ascertain the views of candidates on the question of more liberal laws in relation to the sale of alcoholic beverages. Many committed themselves to oppose any such legislation and became voting members of the 1977 Assembly. We counted heavily upon these friends to hold the line against the encroachment of any new legislation that would merchandise whiskey like apples and oranges, and no such legislation was passed during the 1977 session.

Senate Bill No. 735 was introduced in May. This bill would have given a vote to any county, city or town which had an ABC store to determine if liquor-by-the-drink sales would be authorized. The bill would have allowed the addition of such sales on top of "brown-bagging." In other words, a restaurant which qualified could have had both types of permits. This would have given North Carolina one of the most liberal systems in the United States. Due to some vote-swapping to revive the pornography bill, this measure passed the Senate by a 24 to 23 vote. The proponents of the bill, realizing that it was headed for defeat in the House by at least 15 votes, made a last minute move which sent the bill back to the House ABC Committee, where it will await next year's session of the General Assembly.

This gives us time to organize our forces and to make contacts with our Representatives. You spoke loud and clear in opposition in the state-wide referendum in 1973, and we don't believe you have changed your minds. You are urged to contact your Representatives and either encourage him in opposition to the bill or request his support for the defeat of Senate Bill No. 735.

The Christian Action League appreciates the support which has been given this past year, and reminds you that we can do only that which you enable us to do through your contributions.

CHRISTIAN LIFE AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS REPORT

The Christian Life Council majored on two aspects in 1977—the family and legislative issues. W. Douglas Cole became director of the Christian Family Life Department January 1,

1977. Under his leadership, the Council sponsored marriage enrichment retreats, minister-wife retreats, parenting workshops, conference for engaged couples, sex-education conference and promoted the National Single Adult Conference at Ridgecrest. In addition, many tracts on the family were printed and distributed among North Carolina Baptists.

Since the General Assembly was in session during 1977, the Council was involved on a number of issues. Some of the issues were assigned to the Council by the Convention. Other issues were suggested by the twenty persons who comprise the Council. Some of the legislative concerns were pornography, liquor-by-the-drink, capital punishment, Equal Rights Amendment, chaplains for prisons, etc.

The Council also sponsored a state-wide workshop on death and dying, particularly as it related to euthanasia (easy death) or, as it is commonly called, "mercy killing."

Numerous calls from Baptists for help on social issues keep being received and responded to. The Council attempts to provide information on how to apply one's Christian faith to everyday life.

America suffers from a crisis in morality and integrity. Only as Christians live out their faith will a lost world be improved and changed. To that end the Christian Life Council is dedicated.

BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

The establishment of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation as an agency of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina was approved in 1919 and chartered in 1920. The objectives of this agency of the Convention were clearly stated in its charter:

"1. To promote the making of gifts . . . for the causes and objects fostered by the members of the missionary Baptist denomination in the State of North Carolina, in their cooperative undertakings, and to provide a way of securing greater uniformity of purposes, powers and duties of administration in the management and distribution of the gifts so made;

2. To receive, own, hold, administer, and distribute gifts of any kind . . . to be used for the promotion of the Missionary Baptist cause in general or any specified object of the Missionary Baptist denomination . . ."

The Foundation continues to strive toward fulfilling the objectives stated in its charter. In so doing it will serve more as a trustee than as a foundation, as foundations are presently defined. As trustee, the donor or benefactor makes decisions relative to specific or general recipients of trust income. Assets held in trust by N. C. Baptist Foundation amounted to \$3,696,-612 as of May, 1977.

The emphasis of the Foundation is STEWARDSHIP. We seek to create an increased awareness of and interest in a total Christian commitment as it involves life and possessions. Certain aspects of our efforts are simply interpreting the Christian tenets regarding one's trusteeship of God's gifts. Other factors in our ministry involve technical and legal matters as they pertain to estate planning and distribution of assets. An understanding of these principles provide opportunities for individuals to become better stewards.

The Foundation provides a unique channel for persons to provide tangible financial assistance for all Christian ministries fostered by Southern Baptists—FOREVER—by naming the Cooperative Program as beneficiary of trust funds. This option, of course, is one of many. The specific institution or mission cause may be named as trust beneficiary or any combination of these.

There are three prime methods now utilized through which gifts of possessions can be transferred to benefit Baptist endeavors. The most frequently used, and the source of most assets now held by the Foundation, is the testamentary gift. The charitable remainder trust has proved to be a valuable instrument to encourage lifetime transfers of assets. The third method is through the living charitable trust.

The testamentary gift is simply the transfer from an estate to the charitable cause by statement in a will.

There are a variety of approved methods of transferring property, securities, or money and in turn receive annuity payments for life. Many of the annuity trust instruments meet requirements of government regulations permitting tax relief during the lifetime of the donor.

An outright gift of assets, where income or principal is immediately available for charitable causes, provides many benefits both to the donor and the ministry being supported. In some instances, the residual estate to heirs can be increased through this method of giving.

STEWARDSHIP AND COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

Will YOU lead every member of the church where you serve to give a tithe or more of his income into the church treasury and lead the church to give the suggested amount to the Association plus giving from 10% to 50% of church receipts through the Cooperative Program?

The Southern Baptist Convention theme for this year is "Bold Missions." "But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria and to the end of the earth." This command of Jesus in Acts 1:8 clearly calls for boldness on the part of His followers. These words emphasize our commitment to missions and mission support.

In I Corinthians 3:9, the apostle Paul says, "... we are labourers together for God." We must continually challenge one another as Baptists to minister in Christ's name through the church, through the association, and through the Cooperative Program in bold support of missions at home and around the world.

Commitment to a bold mission task calls for specific action on our part as individuals and churches. During the past year, the churches of our association gave \$67,929 through the Cooperative Program. Last year our churches gave \$21,377.89 for associational missions. Our goal was \$21,014.00.

WE RECOMMEND THESE GOALS:

1. Every church in the association **BOLDLY ADVANCING THEIR GIVING** through the Cooperative Program for world mission support, and giving the suggested amount to Associational Missions.
2. Every church in the association increasing the percentage of the total budget income given through the Cooperative Program.
3. That every church seriously consider its responsibility to develop Christian stewards and determine to elect and train a stewardship committee to assist the church in developing Christian stewards.
4. That every church conduct a stewardship emphasis this year. This coming year, the stewardship theme is "Bold Believers in Giving Through a Growing Commitment."
5. That an associational stewardship conference be held in order to assist churches in planning and conducting their stewardship programs.
6. That every church double Cooperative Program giving and associational missions giving by 1982 ...

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

In 1976, the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention recommended a new retirement program which was approved by all the state Baptist conventions. The new program called the Southern Baptist Retirement Program will go into effect January 1, 1978. Detailed information will be presented to churches in the early fall.

The Board paid \$17,138,343 in benefits to 11,925 widows, retired or disabled members in 1976. During its 59 years of service, the Board has paid more than \$158 million in retirement and protection benefits. A 13th Check amounting to one month's income was mailed for the eleventh time to annuitants. The combined amount of this extra benefit came to \$830,525. Most members benefit from a decision to: increase the interest rate for figuring retirement benefits. Annuitants began receiving larger checks as of January 1, 1977.

For almost 45,000 members, the Board held in trust funds totaling \$472,218,669 for retirement benefits for the year ending 1976. The Annuity Board also administers life, medical and disability insurance programs, which reflected increases in membership. In North Carolina as of March 31, 1977, 2787 staff members of 2196 churches and associations are participating in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program; 2491 in the Family Benefit Section; 1275 in the Age Security Section and 240 in the Variable Benefit Section.

Twenty-six of our Brushy Mountain Baptist Association churches participated in Annuity Board retirement, health, and life insurance programs for a total of thirty members in the association. It is fervently to be hoped that other churches will be led of the Spirit to provide retirement and insurance benefits for their pastor and staff. The associational office stands ready to assist churches desiring to enroll in the plan. It is also an urgent need for each church to participate in the program **BY CONTRIBUTING TEN PERCENT OF THE PASTOR OR STAFF MEMBER'S TOTAL REMUNERATION TOWARD THE RETIREMENT PROGRAM.**

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

The year of 1976 will long be remembered as the year of the "Good News Bible." On December 1 the American Bible Society released this long and eagerly awaited translation of the complete Bible in Today's English Version.

In 1967 while "Good News for Modern Man" was still fresh off the press, the Board of Managers asked a team of seven translators to meet under Dr. Bratcher's chairmanship to translate the Old Testament into Today's English Version. For the next nine years they labored at the task, carefully translating the Hebrew and Aramaic into understandable English.

On December 1, 1976 the "Good News Bible" was made available to all. This wonderful translation created a great splash in the nations news media. One does not think of the Bible becoming a celebrity, but for two weeks in December that is what it was. All three national TV networks carried stories on the Good News Bible. Throughout the country local TV and radio news commentators were talking about this great translation. In December and January more than 1,000 newspapers in America carried stories on the "Good News Bible" informing people of its beautiful message.

The American Bible Society's purpose in producing the Good News Bible is not to take the place of our deeply appreciated older translations, it is designed instead to attract people to Bible reading who have found other translations difficult or obscure in places. The Good News Bible has been issued especially for use by the church in reaching men and women who have never read the Bible at all, or have discontinued reading it because they couldn't easily discover its message for living in today's world.

The American Bible Society gives special thanks to the Southern Baptist Convention for its continuing cooperation with the American Bible Society in supporting the Bible Cause, and asks your continued prayers that the Bible Society, in partnership with the Southern Baptist Convention, may fulfill more effectively its task of bringing the word of God to all who ask for it and need it.

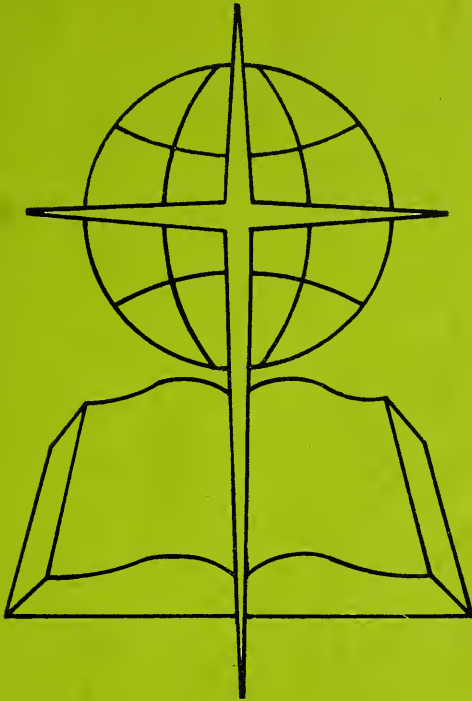

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Constitution**ARTICLE I—NAME**

This body shall be known as the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association of North Carolina.

ARTICLE II—PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this association to consider and promote measures for increasing the harmony, the knowledge and the spiritual life of the churches and for developing and directing their energies and their contributions in the advancement of Christ's kingdom throughout the earth, always in harmony with the teachings of the New Testament. This association shall be an auxiliary to the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in all their missionary, educational and benevolent work.

ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches desiring to affiliate with it. Each church may be represented in the annual associational meetings by its pastor and any other ordained ministers holding membership in it. In addition to these, each church may elect three (3) messengers for the first one hundred (100) members or major fraction thereof, plus one additional messenger for each additional one hundred (100) members or major fraction thereof, provided that no church shall be entitled to send more than ten (10) messengers.

Section 2. Any church desiring to become a member of the association shall present through messengers chosen for that purpose, its request for membership on APPLICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP provided in the minutes along with a UNIFORM ASSOCIATIONAL LETTER provided by the clerk at any annual session of the body. The Moderator shall refer the church to the Committee on New Churches for study and investigation. The church maintains for the year the status of associate membership until the committee makes its recommendation, if favorable, it will be received into full membership with all the rights and privileges at the next annual session. If the association then votes to receive the church, the moderator shall extend the hand of fellowship to the messengers.

Section 3. Any church not representing itself in this body for two successive years, either by letter or by messengers shall be stricken from the roll of churches, unless satisfactory reasons for such failure are given.

Section 4. The association shall withdraw fellowship from any church in its membership which shall be found to be disorderly in faith and practice, but not until written charges are brought against it, which charges shall have been authorized by the official act of the church offering the same. Thereafter, any such charges shall be carefully considered by the association.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. The officers of the association shall consist of a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Director of Music Ministry, School of Christian Studies Director, Director of Evangelism, Librarian and Representatives for the following: BIBLICAL RECORDER, Baptist Hospital, Children's Homes, Homes for Aging, Christian Higher Education, Annuity Board, American Bible Society, Home Missions, State Missions and Foreign Missions. These shall be elected annually on the second day of the annual session before the noon recess adjournment by a majority of the members voting and shall begin their term of office upon final adjournment of the session at which elected and shall continue in office until the close of the next annual session. Any officer may succeed himself, except the Moderator, who may not serve more than two years in succession.

The Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director and Director of Evangelism, will be elected at the Executive Committee Meeting in August. After their election they will become a part of the Nominating Committee.

Section 2. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint all committees not otherwise provided for, and exercise all other duties of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. He shall also, as far as his private duties may permit, visit and communicate with the churches between the sessions of the association to encourage and assist them in their work for the kingdom. He shall appoint a Nominating Committee and Committee on Committees at the annual meeting to serve for the following year. He shall be chairman of the Executive Committee and ex officio member of all other committees.

Section 3. The Vice-Moderator shall discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence, or at his request, and be Vice Chairman of the Executive Committee.

Section 4. The Clerk shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the association; shall superintend their printing and distribution to the churches; shall send one copy each to the General Secretary of the Baptist State Convention, the Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn., the American Baptist Publication Society, Philadelphia, Pa., and to our denominational agencies or institutions requesting them; shall preserve a file of all association records; shall provide at least one month prior to the annual session of the association, form letters for the use of the churches in making their reports to the association and shall suggest to each church, based on the actual cost of printing, the amount needed for the printing and distribution of the Annual. He shall serve as Secretary of the Executive Committee.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all funds of the association, as directed by the association, and make an itemized statement at each annual session.

Section 6. The Historian, in his sole discretion, shall collect facts of interest to the association and the cooperating churches, and shall make a report to each annual session of the association.

Section 7. The Trustees shall be three in number. It shall be their duty to hold in trust any property, endowment or other securities of this association, and to be representative of the association in legal matters.

ARTICLE V—COMMITTEES AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. At each annual session of the association the Moderator shall appoint a Nominating Committee composed of three members from as many different churches. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate and present to the association at its next annual session a complete slate of officers and institutional representatives. After presentation of these nominations the Moderator shall give opportunity for nominations from the floor for any and all of these positions. Should vacancies occur by death or resignation, it shall be the duty of this committee to name a person to fill the vacant position until the next annual session of the association, with the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. At each annual session of the association, the moderator shall appoint a Committee on Committees composed of seven members from as many different churches. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate and present to the association at its next annual session, members of all standing committees not otherwise provided for in this constitution. Should vacancies occur by death or resignation, it shall be the duty of this committee to name a person to fill the vacant position until the next annual session of the association, with the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE shall consist of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Sunday School Director, Associational Church Training Director, Director of Music Ministry, Associational W.M.U. Director, Associational Brotherhood Director and all the pastors of churches within the association together with one member from

each church to be elected by the church. A quorum shall consist of ten (10) members of the committee, including four of the above mentioned officers, providing that either the Moderator or the Vice-Moderator is present. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to cooperate with the Baptist State Convention and with the churches of the association in the promotion of any plans which may seem wise for the extension of Christ's kingdom, and to take such steps as may be necessary to put into successful operation any plans adopted by the association. The committee shall meet at least once each quarter at a time to be agreed upon or at the call of the Moderator. The officers of the association shall be the officers of this committee with the Moderator serving as chairman.

Section 4. THE ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of the associational Sunday School Director, the associational Church Training Director, the associational Director of Music Ministry, the associational W.M.U. Director, the associational Brotherhood Director and three pastors, who along with the chairman, shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees. It shall be the duty of this committee to cooperate with the associational Director of Missions in the extension of Baptist work throughout the associational area, and advise with him in matters pertaining to his work and activities. It shall also be the duty of the committee, in the event of a vacancy in the position of associational Director of Missions, to seek out and recommend to the Executive Committee or the association, a suitable person. It shall be the further duty of this committee to consult with the Finance Committee on matters of expense and to provide information to the Baptist State Convention officials which might be helpful in meeting missionary needs and to make recommendations to the association in matters of this kind.

Section 5. THE FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members with the Treasurer serving as ex officio member. It shall be the duty of this committee to plan and recommend to the Executive Committee and the association a financial budget for the coming year and to supervise the raising and expenditure of funds.

Section 6. THE COMMITTEE ON NEW CHURCHES shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to receive applications from churches seeking admission to the association and, after a visit to such churches, careful investigation and deliberation, to report to the association on such applications in keeping with the provisions of this constitution.

Section 7. THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to study and recommend any necessary change in the constitution and bring reports as necessary to the association.

Section 8. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to arrange the program for the annual session of the association and present the same for adoption at its opening session. The Moderator and Director of Missions will serve as special advisors on this committee.

Section 9. PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to receive or solicit invitations for the place of meeting and to recommend to the annual session a place or

places of meeting, preacher, and an alternate for such sermons or sermon to be presented in the discretion of the committee and the dates for the next annual session.

Section 10. THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to study and report on such resolutions as may be referred to it and to present such other resolutions as may be appropriate at the annual session.

Section 11. THE COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL SERVICE AND CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS shall be composed of three members from as many different churches whose duty it shall be to study the social and civic problems of our area, along with relevant literature available through the Christian Life Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention, and to report to the annual session of the association their findings along with recommendations for specific action by the association and/or cooperating churches.

Section 12. THE STEWARDSHIP AND COOPERATIVE PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duties it shall be to encourage each church to teach and practice Bible stewardship, to give to associational missions, and to support world mission causes through the Cooperative Program.

Section 13. THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM, composed of three members shall promote the work of evangelism in the association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the association or its Executive Committee.

Section 14. THE CALENDAR COMMITTEE shall be composed of the following associational officers: Director of Missions, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, W.M.U. Director, Brotherhood Director, Director of Music Ministry, and president of the Minister's Conference. This committee shall prepare an associational calendar for the year, and present same to the annual meeting, for adoption. This calendar shall be included in the annual.

Section 15. THE COMMITTEE ON ORDINATION, composed of seven ministers, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of candidates for the Gospel Ministry. Churches wishing to ordain ministers are requested to place their candidates before the committee at least thirty (30) days prior to the date set for ordination for examination on the following principles:

- a. Christian experience or conversion
- b. Call to the ministry
- c. Attitude toward denominational work and objects
- d. Support of denominational causes
- e. Moral and spiritual fitness
- f. Doctrinal beliefs
- g. Knowledge of the Bible

Candidates are to be ordained with the assistance of this committee only when they are serving a church or churches as pastor or having been called as pastor of a Baptist church of like faith and practice with those member churches of this association.

No candidate for ordination shall be considered by the committee who has not been a member of a cooperating church for at least one year.

Candidates are to be urged to prepare themselves for the ministry as far as possible in Baptist Institutions of Higher Learning.

This committee shall not recommend any candidate for ordination whom they feel will not bring honor and esteem to the Lord, to Southern Baptists and to the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association.

Recommendations will be made by the committee to the church where the candidate holds membership. The committee will assist the church in the ordination service at a time convenient to the church and to the members of the committee if such assistance is desired.

Section 16. **THE COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS**, composed of three members, shall bring a report at the annual meeting, leading in a memorial service, in memory of those reported by the churches as deceased since the last annual meeting.

Section 17. **PROPERTIES COMMITTEE**. This committee shall be composed of three members and shall have the responsibility of supervision of all properties belonging to the association and shall give attention to the condition of the properties owned by the association. This committee shall make such repairs or improvements as deemed necessary. All matters of major repairs or improvements shall be referred to the Finance Committee for action and recommendation to the Executive Committee. This committee shall make at least one inspection in each quarter of the year of all properties owned by the association.

ARTICLE VI—GENERAL PROVISIONS

Section 1. The employment of a Director of Missions shall follow the procedure outlined in Section 4, Article V, with the understanding that said person be extended an indefinite call and that a period of 30 days notice be given by either the missionary or the association in the event of termination of such employment.

Section 2. The Director of Missions, under the supervision of the Associational Missions Committee, shall be empowered to procure and supervise such necessary secretarial and janitorial personnel for the proper operation and maintenance of the associational office, provided that funds for the hiring and salary of such personnel have been included within the current year's budget.

Section 3. All questions of order not herein provided for shall be decided according to **ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER**, Revised.

Section 4. Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any annual session upon vote of two-thirds of the members present, provided that such amendments be presented on the first day of the annual session and voted upon the second day.

Section 5. **ROTATING OF COMMITTEES**. One-third of each committee shall be elected to serve a period of three years. Committees or parts of committees, composed of organizational heads shall not be subject to rotation. No member shall succeed himself. Vacancies occurring during the year may be filled immediately by the Executive Committee.

Section 6. SPECIAL ADVISORS. The Moderator and Director of Missions will serve on all committees of the association as special advisors.

By-Laws

1. The association shall convene annually on the first Monday in October and continue through the first Tuesday in October or longer in the judgment of the Committee on Order of Business and subject to the approval of the association.

2. Each session of the association shall be opened with religious exercise, conducted by whomsoever the Committee on Order of Business may designate.

3. A majority of the members present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of any business except the matter of making changes in the Constitution.

4. Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator, shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration, and avoid the use of unnecessary personalities.

5. The members shall observe toward the officers and toward one another such courtesies as are becoming to Christians.

6. The annual associational year, for the purpose of reporting statistical information shall be September 1 to August 31, inclusive.

7. Amendments to the By-Laws may be made by a majority vote of members present at any annual meeting of the association.

ONE HUNDRED SEVENTH ANNUAL MEETING

(BOR is used in the Proceedings for the Book of Reports)

1. The 107th Annual Meeting of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association was called to order by the moderator, the Rev. Alfred Andrews, at 4 p.m. on October 2, 1978 at Zion Hill Baptist Church. Associational Music Director Craig Little led the congregational singing with Mrs. Dennis Faw at the piano and Mrs. Walter Stinson at the organ.

3. Welcome was extended by the Rev. L. J. Culler, pastor of Zion Hill Church.

In 1976, Oakwoods entered upon a period of significant church growth which merits special mention. In this two-year period they have participated in the ACTION program (resulting in an increase in average Sunday School attendance from 87 persons to 135 persons), a Lay Evangelism school (resulting in an ongoing outreach program), and they are now involved in a Lay Renewal week-end and a Lay-led Revival for the fall. They have increased in number with 39 baptisms and 26 new members by letter. The budget has increased to \$900 per week. Mission giving to associational support has been increased from \$360 per year to \$1250, and Cooperative Program gifts have been increased from \$520 to more than \$3,600 per year. Mission giving has been put on a percentage basis with 4% going to associational ministries and 9% going to Cooperative Program. Special offerings for missions have also been strengthened significantly.

In the past year Oakwoods has completed a new parking lot, has re-carpeted their entire plant, has provided new Sunday School furniture throughout, has constructed a ramp for the handicapped and has strengthened its organizations by adding Brotherhood and RA work and by increasing girls work (GA, Acteens, Mission Friends) to include all ages.

Approximately 340 members enjoy the church building and beautiful grounds that was built in 1958. A pastorium was added to the church property in 1976.

The church has open office hours for one half day during the week with Mrs. Kay Ellis serving as secretary.

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS REPORT

The following statistical report of the activities of your Director of Missions is not intended to impress but only to inform the people of our association as to the kind of work undertaken during the past year. I regard it a privilege to use whatever gifts and opportunities the Lord has blessed me with in ministry to Brushy Mountain Baptists.

During the past year I have been privileged to serve in or visit thirty-two of the forty-one churches in this association. These opportunities were responded to as follows:

- 18 mission messages
- 7 revival messages
- 20 hours Deacon training
- 34 hours Study Course teaching
- 18 hours School of Christian Studies teaching
- 14 pulpit supply
- 22 other services of various types (addresses to special groups within the churches)
- 6 Ordination Services
- 15 visits during revival services, Sunday School, and worship services
- 45 hours of problem counseling with pastors
- 14 hours counseling with deacons, pastor selection committees and other special committees

In addition to these opportunities within the churches I have also been privileged to:

- Conduct Morning Devotions on WKBC — 10 mornings
- Conduct Brushy Mountain Baptist Hour on WKBC (Saturday morning) — 51 weekly programs
- Conduct Vespers Worship service — 2 Sunday afternoons
- Conduct Worship services at Salem KOA Campground — 4 Sundays

On 37 occasions I have interpreted denominational and associational causes to pastors, and on 21 occasions to churches.

In the course of my duties I have attended and/or conducted 31 associational group meetings, 21 associational committee meetings, and 2 associational training conferences. Beyond the boundaries of our association I have participated in 19 state and denominational meetings, conferences, and workshops, and have participated in 20 meetings with community agencies and institutions. I have also engaged in 315 conferences with individuals (by phone or office contact), 66 groups, and 50 committees. With the able and competent assistance of our office secretary, Mrs. Norma Jean Wood, 4,664 newsletters have been sent out. I have traveled 8,472 miles in carrying out these duties.

I want to make expression of my intense joy in serving my Lord Jesus Christ among the churches and people of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association. I pledge to you my best efforts during the year to come. I shall endeavor to minister to you individually and to your church family as you give me opportunity. My prayers are continually for the spiritual growth of Brushy Mountain Baptists and all of the resources of my self and my office are available as you require them.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Executive Committee of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association met four times during the past year at Wilkesboro Baptist Church. At the November 21, 1977 meeting the moderator, Al Andrews, called the meeting to order and introduced new ministers and new representatives from the churches. John Leek brought devotions using scripture from Romans 12. Twenty-five people represented fifteen churches.

Director of Missions Bill McKinney spoke concerning the treasury, noting that \$1000 in state aid was eliminated from the budget this year as well as \$1000 in support of the radio program. Therefore, the amount in the treasury is low and it will be necessary for the churches to increase their giving by 20% in order for the association to break even.

The Missions Committee report was given by chairman Bill Rogers. The committee is considering ways to become involved in the "Bold Missions" program and the possibility of a prison ministry. Mr. Rogers reminded of the motion made at the annual associational meeting that the Nominating Committee recommend three persons to serve as a Camp Committee for the development of the associational camp property. Since the Nominating Committee was not prepared to make these recommendations to the Executive Committee tonight, Mr. Rogers made a motion that the Nominating Committee be instructed to appoint a Camp Committee and bring their recommendation back to the Missions Committee to be approved at its next monthly meeting so that they could begin to formulate plans to be presented to the next Executive Committee meeting for its approval.

Rex Shumate, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, made the following recommendations to fill open positions:

- Vice-Moderator: Rev. John Leek
- Sunday School Director: Mr. Raymond Blevins
- Director of School of Christian Studies: Rev. Larry Bradley
- Evangelism Committee: Rev. Rex Eldreth
- Evangelism Committee Chairman: Rev. Frank Blevins

The motion to accept these nominations carried.

The moderator instructed the Nominating Committee to select three persons to make up a Camp Committee for the sole purpose to formulate a development plan for the use of the camp property. The committee is to be on a rotation basis (1 member to serve 1 year, 1 to serve 2 years, 1 to serve 3 years) and a chairman should be designated. The Nominating Committee is to report to the chairman of the Missions Committee.

Organizational reports included:

Church Training Director Carl Elledge announced plans for "M" Night on November 28 at Walnut Grove Church.

WMU Director Lillian Foster reported new interest in WMU work with more support from the pastors of the churches.

Director of Missions Bill McKinney discussed "Bold Mission Thrust". The associational office has filmstrips and cassettes available with information concerning this program. Churches were encouraged to make use of this material.

At the February 13, 1978 meeting 18 people represented 11 churches. The moderator called the meeting to order and L. J. Culler led in prayer. Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved and the treasurer's report showed \$2100.19 in the checking account.

Organizational reports included:

Brotherhood Director Max Freeman made a motion that the association have an Associational Baptist Men's Rally and Ladies Night Program to "Meet Your General Assembly Candidates"; seconded by Frank Blevins. Bill Rogers moved an amendment to the motion as follows: That the meeting be called a Brushy Mountain Baptist Associational Rally entitled "Meet Your General Assembly Candidates" sponsored by the Baptist Men. Carl Elledge seconded the amendment and it carried. The motion, with the amendment, then was passed.

Director of Missions Bill McKinney (for Associational *Music* Director Craig Little) announced plans for an associational choir involving 200 members from various churches. The group will meet for rehearsals the first three Monday nights in April and give a concert at the Wilkes Central gym on April 23. Each person would be asked to pay for his own music and the association would pay approximately \$20 for janitorial service in the building. Mr. Little also plans a hand-picked group of about 30 people to prepare special music for the next annual meeting.

Committee reports included:

Larry Bradley of the *Finance Committee* announced that the association had just received a gift of \$4500 and made a motion that this money be placed in a savings account until the Finance Committee could meet to decide upon recommendations to be made to the Executive Committee as to how the money should be used. Frank Blevins seconded the motion. Carl Elledge moved an amendment that the Finance Committee be given authorization to use some of the money for the Camp Property in the interim period between now and the next Executive Committee meeting. The amendment, seconded by Frank Blevins, carried. The motion, as amended, was then passed.

Bill Rogers moved that the gift be acknowledged through a letter expressing sincere appreciation for the very generous donation. The moderator announced that Mr. and Mrs. Max Freeman were the donors. The motion, seconded by Larry Bradley, was approved by acclamation.

Camp Planning Committee Chairman Max Freeman stated that contact with the National Guard indicated that they might not include the work needed on the property before fall. Therefore, private contractor Russell Eller has been contacted for a cost estimate on stabilizing the entrance roads and some needed clearing. Mr. Freeman also indicated that the committee is considering various developmental needs for the property.

The Director of Missions made the following announcements:

1. The leadership of the Baptist State Convention has called for a Day of Prayer on February 26 concerning the Wake Forest/State Convention conflict.

2. An Adult Start-A-Class Workshop at Ardmore Baptist Church on February 14.
3. Key leaders of the association will be attending a conference at Ridgecrest May 15-17 to be trained in new ways to do associational work.
4. The Seminary Extension Classes are going so well that it was necessary to order more supplies.
5. Mr. McKinney acknowledged the receipt of the gift to the association, from an anonymous donor, of a Filter Queen vacuum cleaner worth \$480.
6. Cooperative Program giving, statewide, had increased in the past year.

The moderator passed out forms to be used for recommendations to the Committee on Nominations of the State Convention. He asked that nominations be prayerfully considered, and that the blanks be filled out and sent to the committee chairman.

Carl Elledge brought information from Area Missionary Jim Lambert that the Division of Missions may be able to fund, for 10 weeks, the salary of a summer youth worker who would be involved in the reservoir ministry on weekends and could be used in the churches during the week. The association would need to provide room and board and transportation at approximately \$50 per week. Mr. Andrews asked for comments on this proposal before the next monthly meeting of the Missions Committee.

General Board Representative Curtis Greene spoke of his concern and his understanding of the Wake Forest/Baptist State Convention matter. Director of Missions Bill McKinney reported on facts which emerged during the consideration of the problem by the State Executive Committee and General Board in their January 23-25 meeting.

Seventeen people represented ten churches at the May 1, 1978 meeting which was called to order by the moderator. Mrs. George Johnson read scripture from I Cor. 13 and led in prayer. Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved and the treasurer's report showed a balance on hand of \$1,803.59.

Organizational reports included:

WMU Director Lillian Foster reported on the Annual Supper Meeting held on April 24. Approximately 250 people heard Mrs. Doris McGee speak about her missionary work in Nigeria.

Music Director Craig Little reported on the successful associational choir concert on April 23. About 300 people from 38 churches participated in the choir.

Al Andrews, for *Brotherhood* Director Max Freeman, announced that the "Meet the Candidates" Rally had been scheduled for May 21 at Wilkesboro Church.

Committee reports included:

Finance Committee chairman Betty Mikeal stated that at the March 13 meeting of that committee it was decided to recommend that the \$4,500 which had been given to the association, with accrued interest, be used to establish an account to be called the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association Camp Fund. Her motion was seconded by Larry Bradley and carried.

Al Andrews reported for *Nominating Committee* chairman Rex Shumate that I. V. Couch is recommended to serve as director of the Associational World Missions Conference. Clate Miller moved that the recommendation be accepted and the motion carried.

Missions Committee chairman Bill Rogers commented on the interest of that committee in a better price and shorter delivery time on the associational annuals. He made a motion that the Director of Missions be given authority to negotiate with the company with which he feels the best arrangement can be made. Larry Bradley seconded and the motion passed. Mr. Rogers also announced Associational Emphasis Week May 22-28 and urged churches to emphasize associational missions. Bulletin inserts will be made available to any who will use them.

Director of Missions Bill McKinney made the following announcements:

1. Men and Boys Overnight Camp to be held May 12-13.
2. Eighteen people attended the stewardship supper held on April 25. Packets of materials are still available.
3. Mr. McKinney urged churches to send in written confirmation of their participation in the World Missions Conference to be held in April 1979.

At the August 7 meeting Bill McKinney was elected acting moderator in the absence of the moderator and vice-moderator. Nine churches were represented by 16 people. Larry Bradley led in prayer, the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved and the treasurer's report showed a balance on hand of \$1460.59. There were no organizational reports.

Committee reports included:

Finance Committee chairman Betty Mikeal presented the proposed budget for 1979 and moved its adoption. E. W. McMurray seconded and all present voted in favor of presenting this budget to the annual meeting in October as a joint recommendation of the Finance and Executive Committees.

Nominating Committee — Bill McKinney, for chairman Rex Shumate, presented the following list of officers for 1979:

- Sunday School Director — Rev. John Leek
- Church Training Director — Rev. Carl Elledge
- Brotherhood Director — Mr. Max Freeman
- WMU Director — Mrs. Reba Fender

Larry Bradley moved that these be elected, Clate Miller seconded and the motion carried.

Mr. McKinney thanked Lillian Foster for her good work as WMU Director for the past several years.

Carl Elledge spoke concerning the Baptist Homes for the Aging. The Western North Carolina Home now under construction will be completed in February of 1979 almost a year ahead of schedule. Therefore he made a motion that the Executive Committee endorse a recommendation to:

1. Encourage churches who have made pledges (some set a goal two years ago of \$1.00 per Sunday School member for three years) to carry through on meeting their goals by February 1979.

2. Encourage churches who have not made a pledge to set a goal of \$2.00 per resident member by February 1979 as a one time gift.

Lillian Foster seconded and the motion carried. The Associational Team for the Baptist Homes is W. K. Sturdivant and Carl Elledge, co-chairmen, and captains Larry Bradley, Lawrence Goodman, E. W. McMurray, and J. C. Shaw.

J. C. Shaw proposed that the secretary be asked to send a message of sympathy to the family of the Rev. Wiley Carroll who passed away recently. That motion was carried by acclamation.

Announcements included:

1. Copies of "The Reaper Should Receive Good Wages", a booklet recommending salaries for pastors and church staff members are available from the associational office.
2. The July-August issue of *Church Leader* magazine is devoted to information concerning the State Missions Offering. State Missions Interpreters will be contacting pastors within the next few weeks.
3. The Bold Missions Key Leader Conference will be held August 21 at 7 p.m. at Wilkesboro Baptist Church. Pastors were encouraged to have their church leaders present.
4. The World Missions Conference Steering Committee will be made up of:

Hospitality Chairman — Mrs. Nelle Lloyd

Mission Study Chairman — Rev. Ed Reck

Many of the leaders in the Brushy Mountain Association participated in a conference at Ridgecrest to learn about this program. The primary emphasis was on the *need* for "Bold Missions" and the *preparation* needed to participate with other Southern Baptist Churches in an effort to set and meet goals.

A Brushy Mountain Baptist Association Key Leader Conference was held August 21, 1978, at the Wilkesboro Baptist Church. The Reverend John Leek was the Key Leader for Sunday School emphasis. Plans were discussed for association-wide and individual church participation in a plan for training

workers, increasing enrollment, organizing new Sunday School classes and a review of literature.

It is anticipated that the Bold Mission Thrust in 1978-79 will produce positive results for increased Bible Study in the coming years.

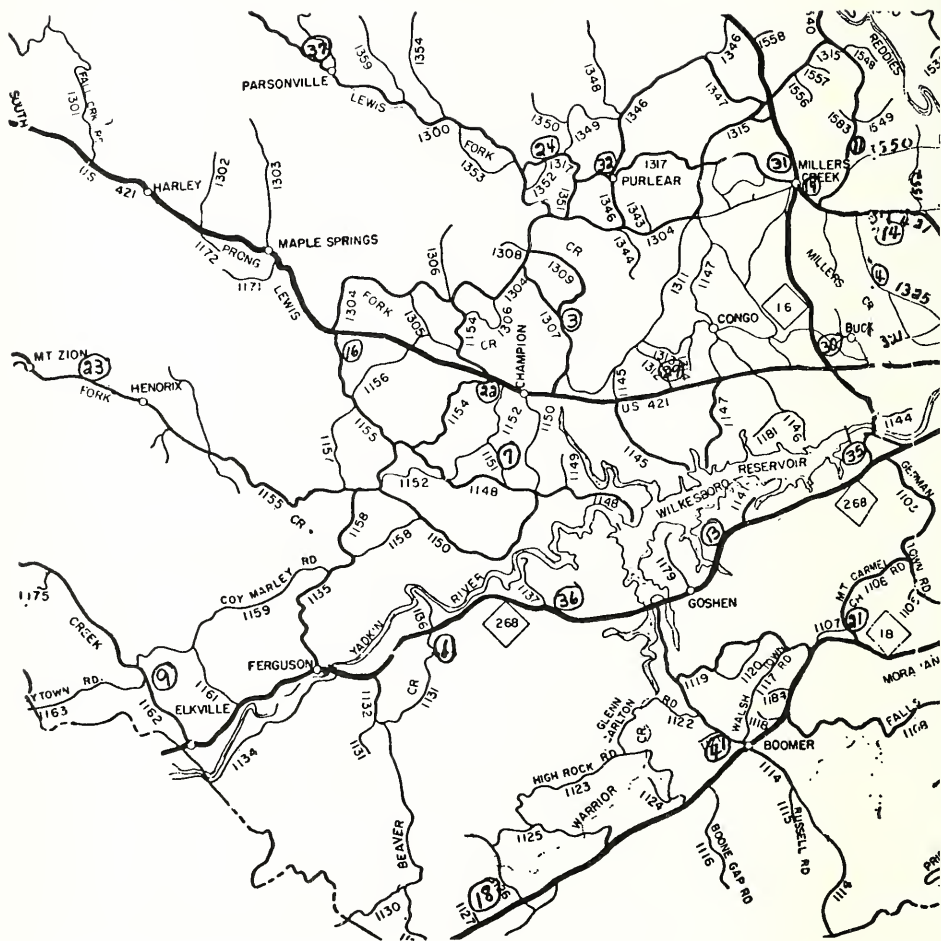

Believing that there is no substitute for training and preparation, an associational leadership conference was held at Wilkesboro Church October 6.

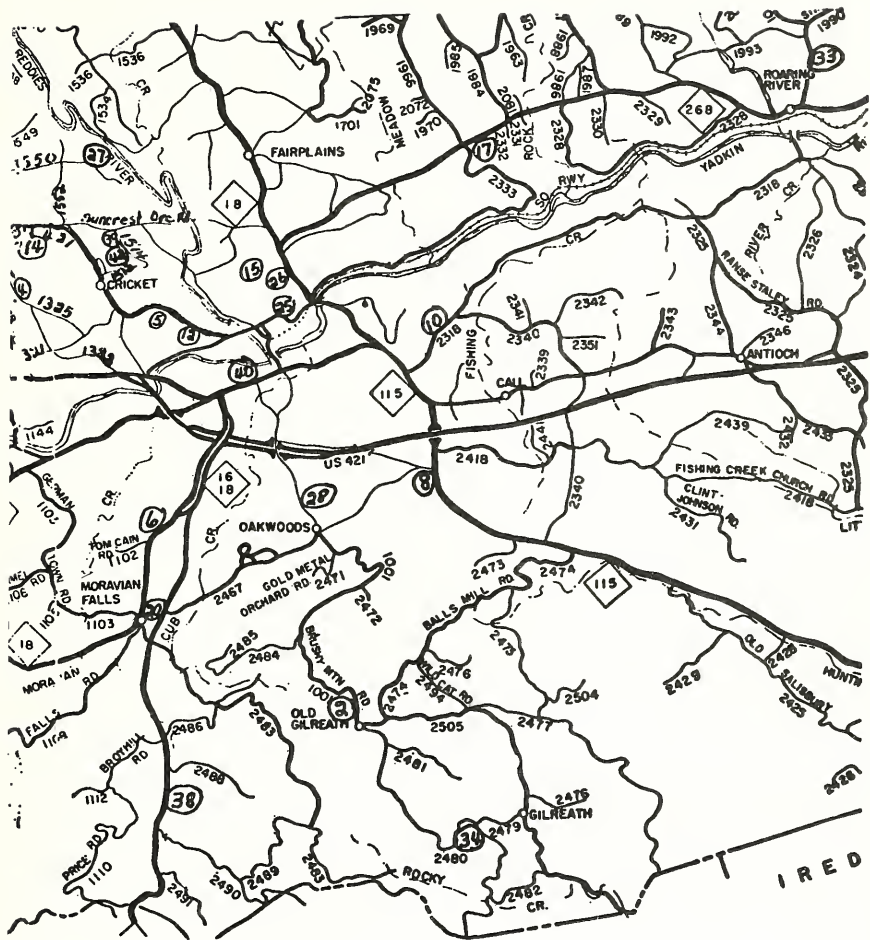

SCHOOL OF CHRISTIAN STUDIES REPORT

Wayland the study of *the Pastor as a Leader*. We had eight enrolled in this study.

We would like for you to know about the home study program that is available. We would like, also, to encourage more of our churches to make it possible for their pastor to be involved in continuing education. You can do this by providing, in your church budget, some money to be used by your pastor to continue his training. EVANGELISM REPORT

A significant goal in Bold Missions is to encourage every church to double baptisms by 1982 or sooner. Christians need to lead unsaved persons to make genuine commitments to Christ and to guide them in their spiritual development. Pastors and church leaders can use the notebook — *Bold Evangelism Through the Local Church* — to plan and develop an ongoing program of evangelism. Free notebooks will be available for those attending the Evangelism Clinic this afternoon here at Oakwoods.

“The Evangelistic Church on Bold Mission” was the theme of the 32nd Statewide Evangelism Conference at the War Memorial Auditorium, Greensboro, during February 6-7, 1978. Evangelistic speakers challenged about 2,400 pastors and lay persons to involve church members in bold evangelism.

About 12,500 youth, pastors and adult leaders attended the 8th Statewide Youth Evangelism Night — August 18 — at the Greensboro Coliseum. Bill Hogue, Director, Evangelism Section, Home Mission Board, Atlanta, was the preacher; Richard and Judy Bradford, Albuquerque, New Mexico, were the soloists, and other youth shared on the program. Follow-up work is always assigned to pastors with all youth who make decisions.

Churches are encouraged to become more involved in Renewal Evangelism. The division of Evangelism cooperates with the Brotherhood Department in this phase of the work.

Sixty-eight associations have participated in one week Lay Evangelism Schools in recent years with 15,000 youth and adults receiving lay witness training from 1,245 churches. Consistent witnessing to non-Christians is essential.

The 33rd Statewide Evangelism Conference will be held in Cumberland County Memorial Auditorium, Fayetteville, on February 5-6, 1979.

In June, Mark Corts, President of N. C. Baptist Convention and Pastor of Calvary Baptist Church in Winston-Salem, spoke to our Baptist Pastor's Conference on “How to Build an Evangelistic Church”.

In August of this year, 16 of our Pastors met in the Key Leadership Conference to discuss the role of evangelism in our "Bold Missions Thrust".

An Evangelism Clinic will be held October 3 at 2:00 p.m. with Dr. John Havlik as guest speaker and a representative from the Department of Evangelism in Raleigh as leader. This is for Pastors and anyone interested in the evangelistic thrust of Bold Missions.

There is the prospect of an area wide Crusade to be held in our Association in 1980. Plans are being studied for this venture now.

GENERAL BOARD REPORT

Between sessions of the Baptist State Convention, the General Board has charge and control of all work of the Convention except the activities designated to the Boards of Trustees of its institutions and agencies. It is com-

posed of one member from associations with less than 20,000 membership; two members from associations with memberships of 20,000-40,000; three members from associations with more than 40,000 memberships and one from each of the ten regions.

The General Board meets three times a year: at Raleigh in January, on a college campus in June or July, and at Caraway in October. In cases of emergency, other meetings could be called.

WAKE FOREST UNIVERSITY MATTER. In regards to the disposition of the Wake Forest issue, the following will explain the disposition of this matter. This was not to everyone's liking, but the General Board felt by both sides making some concessions, we could live with it. We sincerely hope that this problem has been a learning experience both for the Trustees and the North Carolina Baptist as steps are being taken to prevent this happening again.

The Executive Committee recommends that the General Board accept the proposal from the Trustees of Wake Forest University as an acceptable resolution of the problem raised by the CAUSE Grant from the National Science Foundation, contracted June, 1977 (that part designated for the animal/plant facility, \$85,000).

Resolved, That the Trustees of Wake Forest University render full services for all of the funds of the National Science Foundation and demonstrate its confidence in the Department of Biology, by a continuation of the project which would otherwise terminate June 30, 1979, by committing \$85,000 to be expended subsequent to June 30, 1979, in support of the research programs of the Department of Biology.

Your Brushy Mountain Member has been privileged to serve on the Youth and Campus Ministries Committee. This has been quite a learning experience for me. I feel that I can be a better Baptist in the future by having served.

STATE MISSIONS REPORT

Bold Missions is here! The 1978 State Missions Offering is Phase II of the State Debt Retirement Program. The job was begun last year and this year we must finish it. Of the \$1,200,000 goal, \$930,500 is for debts. Last year we saved an estimated \$218,000 in interest alone. This is money we will not have to pay — money that can be used for ministry.

Next year's (1979) North Carolina Missions Offering goal is set at \$2,000,000. The 1977 Baptist State Convention voted to combine all State Convention Offerings — Baptist Hospital, Homes for the Aging, Children's Homes, Christian Higher Education, Heck-Jones, and Mission Projects — into one "North Carolina Missions Offering" in September. This along with the Lottie Moon and Annie Armstrong Offerings will be the only Special Offerings received during the year. This is easier for us to promote in our churches and more money will be provided for each agency.

May God continue to bless as we seek to do His will through missions.

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

At the end of 1977 the Home Mission Board staff reached 102. The missionary force increased 338, growing to 2,830 persons under appointment.

This year brought notes of sadness as two great leaders died. Courts B. Redford, executive secretary-treasurer of the HMB from Jan. 1, 1954 to Dec. 31, 1964 died April 11, 1977, and Arthur B. Rutledge, executive director-treasurer from Jan. 1, 1965 until Dec. 31, 1976, died Nov. 23, 1977.

Financial support was again outstanding. Cooperative Program gifts increased 15 percent and the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions gained 11.58 percent. The HMB received \$9.4 million in the basic CP allocation, plus \$431,507 from the challenge section. The AAEO provided \$10,745,968.

In 1977 emphasis has again been given the Bold Mission Thrust Plan. Phase One of the concentrated effort gave attention to six metropolitan areas and some 60 counties. Mission Service Corps has a goal of enlisting 5,000 volunteers to serve for one or two years, either in the U. S. or abroad, in an effort to reach the objectives of Bold Mission Thrust.

In the past year counsel on church finance was given to some 1,500 churches. Loan applications from 321 churches were processed and approved, totaling \$17,450,000.

During 1977 some 245 chaplains were granted denominational endorsement, bringing the total number of full-time chaplains to 799.

The Church Extension Department assisted 649 congregations with pastoral aid and other financial assistance. A total of 373 new churches and 756 new church-type missions were reported. Christian Social Ministries provided \$116,434 to 16 state conventions for disaster relief. Language Missions has a total of 1,154 persons serving among 33 ethnic groups. Many efforts have been made in both personal and mass evangelism during the past year and church membership is up 1.1 percent. Despite all this only 345,000 baptisms were reported, the lowest in several years. May this be an object of sincere prayer for each of us.

FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

As of January 1, 1978, Southern Baptists were at work in 90 countries with a missionary staff of 2,776. The appointment of 279 missionaries during 1977 exceeded the record of all previous years. This significant advance reflects much prayer and missionary education in the churches of our convention.

In addition to the appointed missionary staff there was a thrilling response to Bold Mission Thrust as a total of 2,413 mission *volunteers* went overseas for periods of mission auxiliary service ranging from two weeks to one year.

In 1977, membership in Baptist churches in conventions to which Southern Baptist missionaries relate exceeded one million persons for the first time. More than 500 new churches were organized during the year and there were 98,715 baptisms. While statistics cannot capture what our mission enterprise has accomplished, the following table may help us grasp some of the scope of our involvement:

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

Nineteen seventy-seven was the year in which more people were reached with God's Word than ever before in the history of the Bible Society.

Founded in 1816, its only aim was and is to translate, produce and to distribute the Scriptures to people everywhere in a language they can understand and at a price they can afford. In this effort to "Let the Word Speak" to all people, the ABS and its partners in the United Bible Societies, last year distributed over 400,000,000 Scriptures in 150 countries. Once planted in the heart, the reader of the seed could then grow through the portions, the New Testament, and eventually, the complete Bible.

An average of nearly once every two weeks during 1977, somewhere in the world a group of people who had never had the Word of God before in their own language, received a portion of the Scriptures for the first time. By the end of the year, at least one book of the Bible had been published in a total of 1,631 languages.

The Bible Society asks for your continued prayers so that together with the churches of the Southern Baptist Convention, and all willing Christians everywhere, our combined efforts to bring His Word to all those who are in desperate need of it will be blessed by God.

CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION REPORT

Baptists of North Carolina support and operate, through elected trustees, six colleges and one university: Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, Meredith, Wingate and Wake Forest University. The seven schools have been in operation for a total of 729 years. Currently, faculty and staff number 1,441. During the 1977-78 academic year, the full-time enrollment of the colleges was 13,000. The total enrollment, including summer school and special students, was more than 19,000.

One of the main issues before our Baptist Colleges this past year was the question of "authority." Who has the final decision in matters relating to policy and control, especially the policy relating to Federal Aid? The decision of the Board of Trustees of Wake Forest to accept certain aid brought the issue into sharp focus.

Both the University and the Convention have been diligent in seeking the right solution to this delicate question. The spirit of cooperation and the genuine concern to resolve the matter in a Christian manner should serve to strengthen the relationship even further in the years ahead. Let us continue to make this a matter of prayer in the Brushy Mountain Association.

Baptists support their colleges and university because they believe these schools offer students a Christian context in support of their quest for a vital and relevant faith. Because we care and demonstrate this commitment through our financial and prayer support, our committees and churches will

continue to be blessed by young men and women returning home committed to Jesus Christ and trained to serve Him.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL — 1978

Baptist Hospital continues to find ways of enlarging and improving its care of patients.

During the past year, the Department of Family Medicine moved into new quarters. It is anticipated that with the larger area, the Family Practice Center will provide primary health care for more than 5,000 families by 1980. Also, the teaching program for resident physicians in Family Medicine will increase to 36 positions by 1980. Many of these physicians are expected to enter family practice in North Carolina.

Other improvements in patient care include the installation of a whole-body scanner and the opening of new and larger facilities for the Intensive Care and Intermediate Nurseries. The body scanner is particularly useful in locating and defining problems such as tumors in the chest, abdomen and pelvic areas; in determining the spread of disease from one organ to another; and visualizing aneurysms in the abdomen. The new nurseries have already played a significant role in reducing the infant death rate and in improving the chances of premature babies growing up without lasting effects from earlier medical problems.

Creation of a new Department of Patient Relations and the employment of a full-time director has also helped to improve the quality of patient care. The primary function of this department is to respond to specific concerns patients have regarding their hospital care and to act in behalf of patients and their families in resolving problems and meeting needs.

A closed-circuit television system will soon be carrying services from the hospital chapel, other devotional programs and educational programs to patient rooms. This system will also be used in staff education programs. The equipment was purchased with funds from the estate of Miss Olivia Hall who worked for Baptist Hospital for nearly a half-century.

The Department of Pastoral Care continues to make a significant contribution to patient care as well as in clinical pastoral education, counseling and enrichment events. During recent months the department has begun another satellite center; this fourth satellite is in Charlotte and is operated in cooperation with the Mecklenburg Baptist Association. In April of this year, the Counseling Center received accreditation by the American Association of Pastoral Counselors.

In recent months, the Medical Center Challenge Program completed a successful fund campaign, over-subscribing its \$18-million goal. The final project in this program will be the replacement of the original hospital building, opened in 1923, with a new Focus Building which is scheduled for completion in 1980.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC. — 1978

A survey in several counties representative of the cross-section of our state has provided interesting information regarding the seriousness, or lack of seriousness, to which stewardship of estates is considered. Court records and wills were carefully studied in these counties to determine the disposition of possessions for a specific time. Facts revealed were:

1. 30% of the decedents died without a written will.
2. Very little was provided for the church or any charitable cause through the wills that were probated (Six-tenths of one percent was given to *all* charitable causes and only 65 one-thousandths of one percent was left to all Baptist causes.)
3. 45% of all assets were left either to husbands or wives, 37% of all assets were left to children by parents, and 27% was left to grandchildren or other persons.
4. Projected to a statewide basis for one year, two-thirds of one billion dollars is left in estates each year.
5. Based on resident Baptist population in the state, a tithe of the estates of Baptists that die each year would provide in excess of \$10,000,000 additional dollars annually to the support of Christian missions and ministries carried on by our churches and denomination.

Baptists who believe in Bold Mission endeavors will:

1. prepare a will or have their will updated;
2. provide for their church pledges and commitments to be fulfilled through their will;
3. seriously consider a tithe of their estates to a Christian cause.

An excellent example to follow is that set by two members of one church in the mountain area of North Carolina. They have willed their possessions to the North Carolina Baptist Foundation as Trustee. Ten percent of each estate will go back to their church and 90% in trust will be paid annually to the Cooperative Program through their church — an amount equal to the entire church contribution to the Cooperative Program in 1977. (And this was a substantial amount.) These two persons through their wills will double the church gifts to missions.

During 1977-1978 fiscal year, the Foundation has received \$198,139 in addition to the trust funds being held. Twenty-seven new trusts were established.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

The year 1977 was one of contrasts for the Annuity Board. While the Board grew markedly in new retirement and insurance accounts, investment earnings suffered due to poor stock market performance.

The year also represented a period of strong demands which resulted from servicing needs of new accounts, a complex asset allocation process, implementation of a new church retirement program and accounting responsibilities of new investment funds.

Key statistics in 1977 included:

1. A permanent 8.33 per cent increase in most annuitants' checks. The increase was retroactive to January 1.
2. A total of \$19,085,316 paid in retirement and protection benefits. Insurance benefits through church, agency and seminarian programs exceeded \$12 million.
3. The enrollment of 545 new churches in the basic retirement plan. New pastors and church employees in Plan A numbered 2,169, and 3,000 members upgraded their program.

Plan A members increased from 27,598 in 1976 to 29,142 in 1977. Enrollment in Plan B rose from 25,142 to 33,062, but Plan C's membership dipped from 5,987 the previous year to 4,885 for the year ended.

In 1977, premium income totaled \$45,603,942 — including relief. Total assets climbed to \$498,977,661, compared with \$473,142,631 a year earlier.

In NORTH CAROLINA as of March 31, 1978, 3,387 staff members of 2,257 churches and associations are participating in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program.

In BRUSHY MOUNTAIN Association 25 churches and 42 staff members are participating in the retirement program. The association is also participating for their Director.

FRUITLAND REPORT

Among the mountains of western North Carolina stands a school by the name of Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute. For many years many have traveled the roads that lead to Fruitland. The compelling verse II Timothy 2:15. "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not be ashamed, rightly dividing the Word of Truth", has motivated many men to attend this school.

Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute was founded in Boone, N. C. in 1946 by Dr. J. C. Canipe, and with the assistance of Dr. M. A. Huggins and the State Mission Board an experimental six weeks school for ministers was held in the First Baptist Church of Boone. Dr. Canipe was president from 1946 to 1960. Seventy-two men responded to this opportunity and the prospects were good. The school was a great success and it was decided that it should be established as a permanent institution. It is owned and operated by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

The school is in full time operation twelve months a year, totaling ninety-six weeks of different studies of the ministry. A class of 25 graduated in September of 1978. There is a building program underway for a new dormitory in the near future. May Fruitland ever be used of God.

BIBLICAL RECORDER REPORT

Think about it for a minute. What if there were no BIBLICAL RECORDER? What means of communication would keep our Baptist people

together in the state? What if we had to depend entirely on the secular news media?

These are questions that should not be taken lightly. Thanks to the wisdom and foresight of Baptist leaders back in 1833, the BIBLICAL RECORDER has been on the scene for 145 years serving North Carolina Baptists.

One of the most important jobs of the BIBLICAL RECORDER is to keep members of Baptist churches informed about what's going on in our denomination, not only here in North Carolina but around the world. When people know, they respond more quickly and in a more cooperative and generous manner.

In that connection, there's one more question: Does the RECORDER pay? Recently the RECORDER published a list of 50 churches which had the best per-capita giving to the Cooperative Program. Forty-nine of the 50 had a good RECORDER club, many of them sending the RECORDER to every resident family. The BIBLICAL RECORDER had a part in helping these congregations see the importance of supporting Baptist causes.

More than 1,100 churches provide their families with the RECORDER through the church budget at a cost of only 6¢ a week. Everyone benefits when the RECORDER goes into every home.

The price of the RECORDER remains reasonable, despite tremendous increases in postage, paper and printing. If your church plans to put the RECORDER in the budget, it should do so this year and thus save money because a price increase is likely.

With the dripping wet news media in North Carolina, our Baptist people must depend on the RECORDER for information about such matters as liquor by the drink. This is only one reason for every church to have a good RECORDER club or put it in the budget.

Woodrow W. Hill, assistant editor and field representative for the past seven years, reached retirement age this past year but has agreed to continue to help the RECORDER in associations and churches. He is loved by people all over the state and we are glad that he will continue to be identified with the RECORDER when needed for special assignments.

RADIO AND TELEVISION COMMISSION REPORT

The year 1977 was the best year the Commission has ever had in all respects. There were more professions of faith, mail response was excellent, and more public service time (\$11.1 million dollars worth) was given by the stations and networks than ever before. The year's statistics provided an outstanding basis for observing the agency's fortieth anniversary in 1978. God's hand of blessing is on this work.

The first 11 Joint Venture Bible Study programs will be produced in the Commission's videotape studio during the week of August 14. The Baptist Sunday School Board is underwriting and sponsoring the series, which will be placed on television beginning in October. "The Baptist Hour," flagship

program of the Commission, entered its 37th year on radio with a drastic change in format. Still a half-hour program, it is offered in stereo and the format is much more informal than it used to be. Dr. Frank Pollard is the current speaker on "The Baptist Hour." The entire series for 1978 was produced in Israel.

At the end of 1977, some 2,885 radio stations were carrying Commission broadcasts, a significant gain of 10% for the year. There is every evidence that 1978 will top that. "Country Crossroads" can now be heard on 687 stations, "MasterControl" is on 756 stations, and "Powerline" stations rose to 924 during the year and will doubtless reach the 1,000 station mark in 1978 — the first syndicated program in the history of broadcasting to reach that level.

One new program, "Streams in the Desert," was introduced in 1977. With only minimal efforts, the station list rose to 94 by year's end. A nationwide potential of more than 500 stations is possible for this inspirational new program.

The Commission launched two new series of television programs early last year — "Listen" and "The Athletes." Response from the audiences has been highly favorable and the evangelistic impact excellent. New episodes of both these new quarter-hour series are currently in production and will be shown throughout this year.

Above 184,000 friends wrote last year for the first time to express appreciation for the programs and to request further information and help. An incredible 14,332 of these wrote to receive spiritual counsel — double the number who wrote in 1976.

More than 2,000 wrote to say they had accepted Christ as Savior, or renewed their commitment to follow Him in discipleship. These friends are followed up extensively, of course, to provide the kind of help and guidance necessary for them to become productive, growing Christians.

During 1977 your Radio and Television Commission worked hard to "give the winds a mighty voice as the Bold Mission concept became reality." Dr. Billy Graham, speaking at the 1978 Abe Lincoln Awards program for broadcasters, said religious radio and television "are among the greatest factors in the resurgence of religion in this country" and cited the Commission as a pioneer in the creative use of the media.

If the world is to hear the good news, radio and television will have to be involved. There are too many worldly barriers, border restrictions, and nations at cold or hot war with one another to expect it to happen any other way. We continually thank God for the tools placed in our hands, and seek to use them prayerfully and skillfully to reach the maximum number of people for Christ.

CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE REPORT

The N. C. Christian Action League has had a very active year. Following a vote which defeated the Liquor-By-The-Drink Bill on Wednesday, June 7th (61-56), in the House of Representatives, one Representative, Mr. Jack Pugh of Asheboro, who had voted against the Bill asked for a chance to reconsider on the following day. Then under heavy pressure from the lobbyists

other Representatives were not present for the vote and the bill carried (57-56). This was sent back to the Senate where they approved the amendments and local option on Liquor-By-The-Drink became lawful. We feel that this is very deplorable because the people of our state spoke loudly and plainly on this matter at the polls in 1973. We do not believe that they have changed their minds.

Now the attention has been shifted from the Halls of the General Assembly to the local areas across the state. There are 43 counties and almost 100 cities and towns with A. B. C. systems. This means that we could be facing this many "Brush Fire" elections in the near future.

The Executive Committee of the N. C. Christian Action League met on June 27, in Greensboro to map strategies for the inevitable battles ahead. These recommendations by the Good Government Committee were approved:

1. That we authorize loans which are to be used for "seed-money" to assist local organizations to make immediate commitments and to act in helping to raise the funds that are needed for the local campaigns.
2. That we make our Associate Director, Rev. Coy Privette, available to any local campaign at the expense of the league.
3. That Editor Marse Grant be asked to write each subscriber of the *Biblical Recorder* requesting a contribution to fight Liquor-By-The-Drink and that every local church be asked to put the Christian Action League in their annual budget or to receive a special offering this year.

We would express our sincere appreciation to the Baptists of North Carolina for their moral and financial support of the Christian Action League in the past. We are depending upon you who have strong convictions against the increased distribution, sale, and consumption of alcoholic beverages in North Carolina and against obscenity and pornography to continue to support the league this year by planning for this in your annual budget or receiving a special offering for these purposes.

A new Associate Director, Rev. Coy L. Privette of Kannapolis, N. C. has been elected and is currently serving on a part-time salary basis. This is expected to add much leadership strength to the league and he is expected to become our Executive Director upon the retirement of Dr. D. P. McFarland.

Strong action is currently under way in the battle against obscenity and pornography in our state. A federal judge in Raleigh ruled "that a statute passed in 1977 by the North Carolina General Assembly which would define and curb pornographic materials in North Carolina violates the first amendment of the Constitution of the United States." Senator I. Beverly Lake will argue this for the North Carolina Attorney General before the Fourth Circuit Court in Richmond, Virginia this fall. Let us pray for his success.

DIVISION OF CHRISTIAN LIFE AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS

The Christian Life Council is comprised of twenty persons elected by the State Convention. These persons give overall leadership to the Council's staff.

A number of moral concerns were addressed by the Council in 1978. Family relationships continue to be a high priority. Opportunities such as marriage enrichment retreats, a workshop on parenting, single adult emphasis,

and minister-wife retreats were conducted by the Council. Various materials dealing with family life were produced and distributed. Strengthening the Christian home is essential to the welfare of our nation and churches and the Christian Life Council is committed to that task.

Much energy was spent working for the defeat of the liquor by the drink bill. Over 125,000 flyers were distributed to North Carolina Baptists. While the efforts of Baptists did not defeat the bill, our efforts did result in a better bill being passed than the one originally proposed.

Another concern of the Council is television and its impact upon the morals of our people. Over 60,000 copies of "The Grabber", a pamphlet dealing with the use and abuse of television, were distributed upon request. Unless Baptists learn to control television, it will control them by occupying their thoughts and time.

World Hunger is an issue which haunts all of us. The Council has printed and is distributing thousands of tracts which offer practical suggestions for Baptists on how to respond to world hunger. August 2 is World Hunger Day among Southern Baptists and the Council attempted to help Baptists be aware of this emphasis.

On several occasions Jesus stated that His disciples were to reflect their faith in Him through their lifestyles. Discovering the will and the way of Jesus is what the Council seeks to do.

HOMES FOR THE AGING REPORT

Since becoming Director of Development and Denominational Relations for our Baptist Homes for the Aging, around three years ago, Ralph Cannon has, on the many occasions that he has spoken at Associational meetings, in churches, and special gatherings, offered to people a dollar bill if anyone in the group could name our current five Baptist Homes for the Aging, and the sixth Baptist Home under construction in Asheville. One person, in all this time, has taken his dollar away from him. Why not read this Associational Report very carefully and give him a "run for the money" the next time that he asks for this information.

North Carolina Baptists have the following Baptist Homes for the Aging:

1. *Resthaven*, located in Winston-Salem, with space for 16 residents;
2. *The Hayes Home* and the *Nursing Care Unit*, in Winston-Salem with space for 46 residents, and 79 patients. The Nursing Care Unit serves all five of our Homes, and will serve the Western North Carolina Baptist Home. Patients are transferred to this nursing facility when long-term nursing care is needed, either for Intermediate Nursing Care, or Skilled Nursing Care.

There is also a duplex apartment complex at the site of the Hayes Home in Winston-Salem, with space for 120 people.

3. *The Albemarle Home*, in Albemarle, with space for 30 residents;
4. *The Hamilton Home*, in Hamilton, with space for 28 residents;

5. *The Yanceyville Home*, in Yanceyville, with space for 31 residents;
6. *The Western North Carolina Baptist Home*, in Asheville, with space for 50 residents, now under construction.

This means that there will be accommodations for 300 people in all of our six Baptist Homes, the apartment complex, and the Nursing Care Unit, when the Western North Carolina Baptist Home in Asheville is completed. This lovely facility is now under construction, and it is anticipated that it will be completed and ready for occupancy by February 15, 1979.

Our Baptist Homes for the Aging have received vital support from our more than 3400 Baptist Churches through two vital sources through the years:

1. The Cooperative Program, which supplies about 8% of our total budget;
2. The Special Offering which supplies 16% of our total budget.

These gifts are used to supplement the care of the majority of the residents in our Baptist Homes. We are grateful for these gifts and for every church and every person who has had a part in making them possible.

Since our February, 1978 offering for the Baptist Homes was the last Special Offering ever, we are greatly concerned that our churches and our people continue their loyal support for the Homes. The total goal of the State Missions Offering for 1979 is \$2,000,000. Our Baptist Homes will receive \$300,000.00 from this Offering, if the total goal is reached. This figure of \$300,000.00 from the time it was projected until September of 1979, will represent a period of two years. During this period we will likely have to borrow money to operate the Homes for the Aging, since we normally receive \$300,000 from the Special Offering.

Also, of great concern is the fact that we are scheduled to open the Western North Carolina Baptist Home, in Asheville around February 15, 1979, to accommodate 50 additional people, prior to the September, 1979 State Missions Offering and with no additional per cent of the Cooperative Program dollar. In fact, we receive 1 2/10% of the Cooperative Program, and this per cent has not been changed during the 27 years of the ministry of the Baptist Homes for the Aging. Though the Homes receive more money through the Cooperative Program than formerly, in dollars the per-centage of the budget of the Homes provided through the Cooperative Program has dropped 10% to 8%. It is estimated that we will need an additional \$100,000.00 to operate the Western North Carolina Baptist Home. From whence shall this come? We believe that it will come from our Baptist people, as we meet the 1979 State Missions goal of \$2,000,000; and that we will give more through the Cooperative Program for all of our Baptist work.

A new proposed wing to the Hayes Home in Winston-Salem which will house 51 additional patients and residents will bring our total capacity in all of the Homes and the Nursing Care Unit to 351 persons.

The Executive Committee of the Brushy Mountain Association, at its August 7, 1978 meeting, voted to endorse the following proposals:

1. That each church which has already set a goal in relation to the Western North Carolina Home in Asheville be encouraged to carry through on reaching its goal (prior to February, 1979 if possible).

2. That those churches which have not previously taken any action concerning this project be encouraged to set a goal of \$2.00 per resident member, to be given as a one-time gift (prior to February, 1979 if possible).

CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

The programs, services and facilities of the Baptist Children's Homes of N. C. are being utilized well for the care of children and in providing assistance to families that need our help. North Carolina Baptists and other friends continue to support this ministry through personal involvement, prayer and financial support.

Requests are coming to the Homes from various sections of the state for additional community-based services (such as, emergency care and group homes). This is a wholesome trend in child care. Children can best be served and families strengthened when care can be provided reasonably close to a child's home. We will respond to additional requests for programs and services as financial resources permit.

N. C. Baptists have reason to be pleased with work that is currently in progress throughout the state. In the piedmont area, Mills Home, foster home services, emergency care at Burlington and Charlotte, the high adventure program at Wall Home, the Child Development Center on the Mills Home campus, programs of crisis intervention, counseling, and family education fill a particular need in this area of the state.

We are deeply grateful for the support of the Children's Homes which comes from our churches through the Cooperative Program, special gifts and the traditional Thanksgiving offering.

The forthcoming Thanksgiving offering is extremely important. This will be the last time that our people will have the challenge of making an over and above offering to the Children's Homes at Thanksgiving time. As a part of the Bold Missions thrust, the Thanksgiving offering for the Children's Home in 1979 will become a part of the North Carolina Baptist State Missions offering to be received each September thereafter.

To bridge the transitional gap next year, our trustees have set a goal of \$1,000,000 (one million dollars) through the 1978 Thanksgiving offering. We are dependent upon our friends for financial support sufficient to carry on this ministry.

A BRIEF HISTORICAL PERIOD OF EDGEWOOD BAPTIST CHURCH

The early history of Edgewood Baptist Church is recorded in the 1959 Brushy Mountain Associational Annual. This brief report is on the twenty year period between 1959-1979.

The ministers who have served during this twenty year period are: Reverend Harvey White, December 1956-September 1969; Reverend Charlie Poole, Interim December 1969-December 1970; Reverend Frank Walker, March 1971-March 1976; and Reverend Rex Shumate, 1977-now serving.

The following general officers have served during this period.

Sunday School Directors: Phillip Wilson, 1965-1966; Ted Hayes, 1967-1973; Dwayne Barnette, 1974; Ted Hayes, 1975-1977; and Clarence Carty, 1978-1979.

Chairman of Deacons: Felix Johnson, 1965; Clifford Moore, 1966-1968; James Brookshire, 1969-1970; M. M. Anderson, Jr., 1971-1972; Com-

mie Hayes, 1973-1975; M. M. Anderson, Jr., 1976; Ted Hayes, 1977-1979; Dennis Brannock, 1979-now serving.

Treasurer: Clifford Moore, 1965-1973; Dale Brown, 1974-1979

Clerk: Miss Della Bumgarner, 1965; Mrs. Vaughn Elledge, 1966-1972; Mrs. Dorothy White, 1973; Mrs. Dennis Brannock, 1974-now serving.

The Edgewood Baptist Church has had a continuous growth in membership and attendance. In 1959 the resident membership was 104. In September 1979 the resident membership was 228. In 1959 the Sunday School average attendance was 55, in 1979 it is 100.

Many physical improvements have been made. Outside, a new parking lot was added and a new steeple was erected on the church building. Inside, the entire floor space was carpeted. A pastor's study and new library were arranged. Also, a public address system and new organ were purchased. Plans and preparation for additional Sunday School rooms are being considered.

UNUSUAL MEMBERS: Miss Della Bumgarner served as church clerk from 1934-1966. Dr. Clifford Moore served as church treasurer from 1937-1974. Mr. C. G. Glass, who is the oldest church member, was baptized in August 1905.

HISTORY OF BEAVER CREEK BAPTIST CHURCH

The history of Beaver Creek Baptist Church was written in 1949 by H. G. Duncan for the one hundred seventieth year celebration which was held when Rev. John Wells was pastor. In 1956 Mr. J. F. Jordan and H. G. Duncan wrote the history which is recorded in the Minutes of the eighty-fifth annual session of the Brushy Mountain Association. At that time Beaver Creek Church minutes prior to 1909 were believed to be lost.

In 1957 three books of minutes were discovered in a trunk in the attic of former clerk G. H. Walker's home. The records cover the period from 1819 to 1907, pushing the span of records back to within forty years of the church's constitution. At this date the first forty years of records are still lost.

Through research done by Mr. Tony Jones, Church Historian, we have proof of 1779 being the year the church was constituted; making 1979 the Two Hundredth Anniversary which was celebrated with an all day service on May 27, 1979.

The earliest known record of Beaver Creek Baptist Church was a petition presented to Dutchman's Creek Baptist Church (later known as Eaton's in Davie County) regarding a Constitution. This was found in the minutes books of Dutchman's Creek Church. It was dated May 8, 1779.

Very little information is known about the founders of this church. However, one account was that of Celia Goulds who lived somewhere around this time. She stated the Rev. George McNeil organized Beaver Creek Church in 1779. The Baptists had become strong patriots and Rev. McNeil was chaplain at the battle of King's Mountain serving with settlers from Beaver Creek and Wilkes County. Another account indicates that Rev. William Cook, Pastor of Dutch-

man's Creek Church, assisted in the formation of Beaver Creek Church. He was an itinerant minister and came to Beaver Creek Church many times.

Rev. John Barlow was the first pastor of Beaver Creek Church on record. In August and September, 1782 the Dutchman's Creek Church took measures to have Elder Barlow to come down to help in the administration of the Lord's Supper.

Other records show that Beaver Creek Church first joined the Strawberry Association in Virginia. In 1786 Beaver Creek Church, with other churches of North Carolina, formed the branch of the Strawberry Association. This association became the Yadkin Association and gained independence from the Strawberry Association in August, 1790. The introductory sermon was given by Rev. Andrew Baker, stated as pastor of Beaver Creek Church serving with Rev. John Barlow.

The Asplunds register states that in 1791 Beaver Creek Church had 30 members, with Rev. Barlow as pastor. In 1797 Beaver Creek Church joined the formation of the Mountain Association.

The earliest known building of Beaver Creek Church was a very large structure made of logs with a huge fireplace on the east wall and a window or windows on the west side. The windows were big wooden shutters that opened upward; there was no glass. Inside there was a section for slaves. The seats were of split logs. The log building was also used as a school for the community. The building was located 200 yards from the present church.

November 6, 1819 is the earliest recorded date in the existing minute books. Smith Ferguson is the first pastor mentioned serving from 1826 to 1844. Forty one pastors have served the church since that time.

Business meetings were held once each month on Saturday afternoon followed by preaching. Preaching was also held the following Sunday morning. At the business meetings members were received by experience and also by letter. Each year three delegates to the association were elected. Letters to the association were read and approved. Rules of Decorum were often read and when members were accused of acting in an unchristian manner the allegation was brought before the church. If the difficulty could not be settled a committee of three was appointed to investigate and report back to the church. If parties involved did not give satisfaction by repentance they were asked to "give up their seat" until satisfaction could be had. Offenses such as falsehood, indecency, drinking too much spirits, stealing corn, fodder and feathers, fighting, profanity, controversy over land and money and other acts were dealt with. If found guilty and the member did not ask to be forgiven, they were excluded from the church.

If members failed to attend church they were cited to come give satisfaction and if they did not their names were removed from the rolls.

One hundred years ago, 1879, Issac Oxford was pastor. Milton McNeil was church clerk. The pastor's salary was \$24.00.

The Adventist Doctrine caused a division in the church which resulted in the establishing of the Advent Christian Church. Milton McNeil was ordained as minister and delegates were chosen to attend the Sunday School convention.

Other ministers who were ordained in the church: 1827 William Kendall, 1840 William Brown, 1851 Joel H. Brown, 1925 A. J. Foster, 1942 W. F. Payne. Those licensed but no record of ordination: 1847 John Brown, 1887 J. H. Andrews, 1920 L. C. Matherly.

First church clerk on record was Eli Brown in 1822. A total of 21 clerks have served with Z. T. Ferguson serving from 1888 until 1919 a total of 29 years.

Mission giving was first recorded in 1881. The amount of sixty cents was given for foreign missions. Collections were taken annually for foreign and home missions. Associational Minutes and the orphanage, usually small amounts of less than five dollars. In 1979 8% of all contributions given go to the Co-operative Program and 4% go to Associational Missions.

The first record of pastor's salary was in 1842. The sum of \$8.00 plus \$2.25 from the last Will and Testament of Bro. John Kendall who was the first treasurer on record.

Sunday School was first called Sabbath School organized in 1861 and still existed in 1873 when Milton McNeil was appointed superintendent. The Sabbath School was "established to teach how to read the scriptures and for religious instruction."

Membership in 1831 was 43 and in 1833 it was 75. In 1978 the total membership was 195.

BYPU was organized some time during the nineteen thirties but was short lived. Training Union, organized in 1959, is still held regularly.

Women's Missionary Society was first organized during the early 1940's and reorganized in 1954 with two groups of G.A.'s. In 1975 Acteens was organized, in 1979 B.Y.W., and R.A.'s organized in 1956.

Bible School is held annually.

In 1936 preaching services were held twice each month continuing until 1956 when Rev. Robert Schreckenber was called, the first full time pastor to live on the field. In 1957 the church returned to twice a month services when Rev. Clayton R. Barker became pastor. In 1961 Rev. C. E. Lawing was called as pastor and the church again went to full time services. In 1967 Rev. Joe B. Crouch was called as pastor. Rev. David Bame was called in 1975, serving until 1978. Rev. Avery Church was called as interim, serving until May 1979 when the present pastor, Rev. Kendall Hatton, was called.

In 1891 the church settled with the carpenters for building the church house. Collected and paid was \$199.82, leaving unpaid \$78.18. This building was sold to Mr. T. W. Ferguson in 1937 when the original part of the present building was erected. No records of cost is known as records from May 1937 to September 1944 cannot be located. The bell in the belfrey was from the old Beaver Creek School.

In 1945 ten Sunday School rooms were added at a cost of \$4,871.71. In 1945 also, furniture was purchased at a cost of \$1,850.00 and the old pews sold for \$79.00. On August 4, 1951, the building was dedicated. In 1948 Mr. C. W. Ferguson gave one acre of land to enlarge the cemetery.

In 1954 three-fourths acre of land was bought from Mr. C. W. Ferguson and in 1956 the parsonage was built at a cost of \$7,500.00. On November 6, 1961 a note burning and dedication was held. In 1961 lots were bought from Mr. T. W. Ferguson where, in 1965, the picnic pavilion was built in honor of Mr. L. C. Matherly. In 1961 the road that ran in front of the church was relocated making a better parking area which was surfaced in 1972 at cost of \$1,900.00. In 1970 the building was remodeled, adding two rooms at the front, a new steeple, interior refinished, exterior bricked, and memorial windows installed at cost of \$15,000. The Furniture was refinished at cost of \$1,800. In 1972 a sound system was installed and in 1976 air conditioning.

On July 4, 1976 the Advent Christian Church met with the Baptist Church for a day of celebration observing the National Bicentennial Year.

In 1972 the oldest church book was loaned to the Wilkes County Genealogy Society for research and books through 1961 were microfilmed.

In 1979 the oldest three books were photostatically copied and on May 27, closing the program of the two hundredth year celebration, the three oldest books were presented to Mr. J. Jay Anderson who represented Wilkes Community College by Mrs. Myrtle G. Horton, Clerk, to be placed on loan for preservation in the James Larkin Pearson Building when it is completed.

Constitution

ARTICLE I—NAME

This body shall be known as the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association of North Carolina.

ARTICLE II—PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this association to consider and promote measures for increasing the harmony, the knowledge and the spiritual life of the churches and for developing and directing their energies and their contributions in the advancement of Christ's kingdom throughout the earth, always in harmony with the teachings of the New Testament. This association shall be an auxiliary to the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in all their missionary, educational and benevolent work.

ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches desiring to affiliate with it. Each church may be represented in the annual associational meetings by its pastor and any other ordained ministers holding membership in it. In addition to these, each church may elect three (3) messengers for the first one hundred (100) members or major fraction thereof, plus one additional messenger for each additional one hundred (100) members or major fraction thereof, provided that no church shall be entitled to send more than ten (10) messengers.

Section 2. Any church desiring to become a member of the association shall present through messengers chosen for that purpose, its request for membership on APPLICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP provided in the minutes along with a UNIFORM ASSOCIATIONAL LETTER provided by the clerk at any

annual session of the body. The Moderator shall refer the church to the Committee on New Churches for study and investigation. The church maintains for the year the status of associate membership until the committee makes its recommendation, if favorable, it will be received into full membership with all the rights and privileges at the next annual session. If the association then votes to receive the church, the moderator shall extend the hand of fellowship to the messengers.

Section 3. Any church not representing itself in this body for two successive years, either by letter or by messengers shall be stricken from the roll of churches, unless satisfactory reasons for such failure are given.

Section 4. The association shall withdraw fellowship from any church in its membership which shall be found to be disorderly in faith and practice, but not until written charges are brought against it, which charges shall have been authorized by the official act of the church offering the same. Thereafter, any such charges shall be carefully considered by the association.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. The officers of the association shall consist of a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Director of Music Ministry, School of Christian Studies Director, Director of Evangelism, Librarian and Representatives for the following BIBLICAL RECORDER, Baptist Hospital, Children's Homes, Homes for the Aging, Christian Higher Education, Annuity Board, American Bible Society, Home Missions, State Missions and Foreign Missions. These shall be elected annually on the second day of the annual session before the noon recess adjournment by a majority of the members voting and shall begin their term of office upon final adjournment of the session at which elected and shall continue in office until the close of the next annual session. Any officer may succeed himself, except the Moderator, who may not serve more than two years in succession.

The Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director and Director of Evangelism, will be elected at the Executive Committee Meeting in August. After their election they will become a part of the Nominating Committee.

Section 2. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint all committees not otherwise provided for, and exercise all other duties of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. He shall also, as far as his private duties may permit, visit and communicate with the churches between the sessions of the association to encourage and assist them in their work for the kingdom. He shall appoint a Nominating Committee and Committee on Committees at the annual meeting to serve for the following year. He shall be chairman of the Executive Committee and ex officio member of all other committees.

Section 3. The Vice-Moderator shall discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence or at his request, and be Vice Chairman of the Executive Committee.

Section 4. The Clerk shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the association; shall superintend their printing and distribution to the churches; shall send one copy each to the General Secretary of the Baptist State

Convention, the Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn., the American Baptist Publication Society, Philadelphia, Pa., and to our denominational agencies or institutions requesting them; shall preserve a file of all association records; shall provide at least one month prior to the annual session of the association, form letters for the use of the churches in making their reports to the association and shall suggest to each church, based on the actual cost of printing, the amount needed for the printing and distribution of the Annual. He shall serve as Secretary of the Executive Committee.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all funds of the association, as directed by the association, and make an itemized statement at each annual session.

Section 6. The Historian, in his sole discretion, shall collect facts of interest to the association and the cooperating churches, and shall make a report to each annual session of the association.

Section 7. The Trustees shall be three in number. It shall be their duty to hold in trust any property, endowment or other securities of this association, and to be representative of the association in legal matters.

ARTICLE V—COMMITTEES AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. At each annual session of the association the Moderator shall appoint a Nominating Committee composed of three members from as many different churches. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate and present to the association at its next annual session a complete slate of officers and institutional representatives. After presentation of these nominations the Moderator shall give opportunity for nominations from the floor for any and all of these positions. Should vacancies occur by death or resignation, it shall be the duty of the committee to name a person to fill the vacant position until the next annual session of the association, with the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. At each annual session of the association, the moderator shall appoint a Committee on Committees composed of seven members from as many different churches. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate and present to the association at its next annual session, members of all standing committees not otherwise provided for in this constitution. Should vacancies occur by death or resignation, it shall be the duty of this committee to name a person to fill the vacant position until the next annual session of the association, with the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE shall consist of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Sunday School Director, Associational Church Training Director, Director of Music Ministry, Associational W.M.U. Director, Associational Brotherhood Director and all the pastors of churches within the association together with one member from each church to be elected by the church. A quorum shall consist of ten (10) members of the committee, including four of the above mentioned officers, providing that either the Moderator or Vice-Moderator is present. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to cooperate with the Baptist State Convention and with the churches of the association in the promotion of any plans which may seem wise for the extension of Christ's kingdom, and to take such steps as may be necessary to put into successful operation any plans adopted by the association. The committee shall meet at least once each quarter at a time to be

agreed upon or at the call of the Moderator. The officers of the association shall be the officers of the committee with the Moderator serving as chairman.

Section 4. THE ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of the associational Sunday School Director, the associational Church Training Director, the association Director of Music Ministry, the associational W.M.U. Director, the associational Brotherhood Director and three pastors, who along with the chairman, shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees. It shall be the duty of this committee to cooperate with the associational Director of Missions in the extension of Baptist work throughout the associational area, and advise with him in matters pertaining to his work and activities. It shall also be the duty of the committee, in the event of a vacancy in the position of associational Director of Missions, to seek out and recommend to the Executive Committee or the association, a suitable person. It shall be the further duty of this committee to consult with the Finance Committee on matters of expense and to provide information to the Baptist State Convention officials which might be helpful in meeting missionary needs and to make recommendations to the association in matters of this kind.

Section 5. THE FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members with the Treasurer serving as ex officio member. It shall be the duty of this committee to plan and recommend to the Executive Committee and the association a financial budget for the coming year and to supervise the raising and expenditure of funds.

Section 6. THE COMMITTEE ON NEW CHURCHES shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to receive applications from churches seeking admission to the association and, after a visit to such churches, careful investigation and deliberation, to report to the association on such applications in keeping with the provisions of this constitution.

Section 7. THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to study and recommend any necessary change in the constitution and bring reports as necessary to the association.

Section 8. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to arrange the program for the annual session of the association and present the same for adoption at its opening session. The Moderator and Director of Missions will serve as special advisors on this committee.

Section 9. PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to receive or solicit invitations for the place of meeting and to recommend to the annual session a place or places of meeting, preacher, and an alternate for such sermons or sermon to be presented in the discretion of the committee and the dates of the next annual session.

Section 10. THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to study and report on such resolutions as may be referred to it and to present such other resolutions as may be appropriate at the annual session.

Section 11. THE COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL SERVICE AND CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS shall be composed of three members from as many different churches whose duty it shall be to study the social and civic problems of our area, along with relevant literature available through the Christian Life Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention, and to report to the annual

session of the association their findings along with recommendations for specific action by the association and/or cooperating churches.

Section 12. THE STEWARDSHIP AND COOPERATIVE PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duties it shall be to encourage each church to teach and practice Bible stewardship, to give to associational missions, and to support world mission causes through the Cooperative Program.

Section 13. THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM, composed of three members shall promote the work of evangelism in the association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the association or its Executive Committee.

Section 14. THE CALENDAR COMMITTEE shall be composed of the following associational officers: Director of Missions, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, W.M.U. Director, Brotherhood Director, Director of Music Ministry, and president of the Minister's Conference. This committee shall prepare an associational calendar for the year, and present same to the annual meeting, for adoption. This calendar shall be included in the annual.

Section 15. THE COMMITTEE ON ORDINATION, composed of seven ministers, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of candidates for the Gospel Ministry. Churches wishing to ordain ministers are requested to place their candidates before the committee at least thirty (30) days prior to the date set for ordination for examination on the following principles:

- a. Christian experience or conversion
- b. Call to the Ministry
- c. Attitude toward denominational work and objects
- d. Support of denominational causes
- e. Moral and spiritual fitness
- f. Doctrinal beliefs
- g. Knowledge of the Bible

Candidates are to be ordained with the assistance of this committee only when they are serving a church or churches as pastor or having been called as a pastor of a Baptist church of like faith and practice with those member churches of this association.

No candidate for ordination shall be considered by the committee who has not been a member of a cooperating church for at least one year.

Candidates are to be urged to prepare themselves for the ministry as far as possible in Baptist Institutions of Higher Learning.

This committee shall not recommend any candidate for ordination whom they feel will not bring honor and esteem to the Lord, to Southern Baptists and to the BRUSHY Mountain Baptist Association.

Recommendations will be made by the committee to the church where the candidate holds membership. The committee will assist the church in the ordination service at a time convenient to the church and to the members of the committee if such assistance is desired.

Section 16. THE COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS, composed of three members, shall bring a report at the annual meeting, leading in a memorial service, in memory of those reported by the churches as deceased since the last annual meeting.

Section 17. PROPERTIES COMMITTEE. This committee shall be composed of three members and shall have the responsibility of supervision of all

properties belonging to the association and shall give attention to the condition of the properties owned by the association. This committee shall make such repairs or improvements as deemed necessary. All matters of major repairs or improvements shall be referred to the Finance Committee for action and recommendation to the Executive Committee. This committee shall make at least one inspection in each quarter of the year of all properties owned by the association.

ARTICLE VI—GENERAL PROVISIONS

Section 1. The employment of a Director of Missions shall follow the procedure outlined in Section 4, Article V, with the understanding that said person be extended an indefinite call and that a period of 30 days notice be given by either the missionary or the association in the event of termination of such employment.

Section 2. The Director of Missions, under the supervision of the Associational Missions Committee, shall be empowered to procure and supervise such necessary secretarial and janitorial personnel for the proper operation and maintenance of the associational office, provided that funds for the hiring and salary of such personnel have been included with in the current year's budget.

Section 3. All questions of order not herein provided for shall be decided according to ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER, Revised.

Section 4. Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any annual session upon vote of two-thirds of the members present, provided that such amendments be presented on the first day of the annual session and voted upon the second day.

Section 5. ROTATING OF COMMITTEES. One-third of each committee shall be elected to serve a period of three years. Committees or parts of committees, composed of organizational heads shall not be subject to rotation. No member shall succeed himself. Vacancies occurring during the year may be filled immediately by the Executive Committee.

Section 6. SPECIAL ADVISORS. The Moderator and Director of Admissions will serve on all committees of the association as special advisors.

Bylaws

1. The association shall convene annually on the first Monday in October and continue through the first Tuesday in October or longer in the judgement of the Committee on Order of Business and subject to the approval of the association.

2. Each session of the association shall be opened with religious exercise, conducted by whomsoever the Committee on Order of Business may designate.

3. A majority of the members present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of any business except the matter of making changes in the Constitution.

4. Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator, shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration, and avoid the use of unnecessary personalities.

5. The members shall observe toward the officers and towards one another such courtesies as are becoming to Christians.

6. The annual associational year, for the purpose of reporting statistical information shall be September 1 to August 31, inclusive.

7. Amendments to the By-Laws may be made by a majority vote of members present at any annual meeting of the association.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Executive Committee of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association met four times during the past year at Wilkesboro Baptist Church. At the NOV. 6, 1978 meeting 22 people represented 13 churches. The moderator, Rev. Al Andrews, called the meeting to order and Harold Hayes, representative from Hinshaw Street Church, brought devotions.

New representatives from North Wilkesboro Second, Welcome Home, Beaver Creek, Cub Creek, North Wilkesboro First, and Hinshaw Street Churches were recognized.

The treasurer's report showed \$3,046.54 in the checking account with one outstanding bill of approximately \$1,000 for associational annuals.

Bill McKinney commended Associational Music Director Craig Little for his work and reported that another associational choir concert is planned in 1979. Also planned is a School of Music led by Baptist State Convention music department staff on March 12-14, 1979—the Wednesday March 14 date being subject to approval by the pastors since this would be the night of many midweek services. This activity would be opened to adjoining associations and would include several classes for all levels of music abilities. A motion was made by Larry Bradley to recommend that Mr. Little be encouraged to pursue this activity and that pastors be encouraged to support a three-night school. Frank Blevins seconded and the motion carried.

The application of Purlear Baptist Church for pastoral supplement to assist Pastor Earl Sheets, Jr. addressed to the Missions Committee of the Baptist State Convention of N. C., was read, considered, and approved in the amount of \$3,000. Pastor Sheets is pursuing a course of study at Wilkes Community College.

Mr. McKinney made the following announcements:

1. Twenty churches are committed to the World Missions Conference to be held April 1-6, 1979 involving eight foreign missionaries, eight home missionaries and four state and associational missionaries. It is suggested that the event be promoted as a "World Mission Revival".

2. He reported for the Missions Committee that the ministry at the KOA Campground last summer was very enthusiastically received and has been requested again next summer.

At the FEBRUARY 12, 1979 meeting 17 people represented 10 churches. The moderator called the meeting to order and Mrs. Darrel Brown, representative from Fishing Creek Church, brought devotions.

The treasurer's report and minutes from the last meeting were read and approved.

Director of Missions Bill McKinney announced that \$2004 in pastoral aid for Purlear Church Pastor Earl Sheets, Jr. had been granted by the Baptist State Convention.

The moderator recognized the work of Brushy Mountain Association people who are serving in state positions. Frank Blevins suggested that this list be published in the newsletter.

A motion was made by E. W. McMurray, seconded and passed, that the trustees of the association be instructed to sell the block of 100 shares of Lowe's Companies stock donated at the market price specified.

Nominating Committee Chairman L. J. Culler moved the election of Phil Billings as Associational Church Training Director and Margaret Andrews as Associational WMU Director. Frank Blevins seconded and the motion carried.

Director of Missions Bill McKinney discussed the following:

1. Interest in Bold Mission activities in cooperation with the state of Maryland involving the pairing of associations and churches and various ministries.

Lawrence Goodman made a motion that the Executive Committee authorize the Missions Committee and the Director of Missions to proceed with working

out plans for such activities and ministries. Frank Blevins seconded and the motion carried.

2. The World Missions Revival April 1-6 will begin with a rally on March 31. A meal for missionary personnel and participating church pastors will be served at 6:30 p.m. with the rally at 7:30 open to all.

At the MAY 7, 1979 meeting 18 people represented 12 churches. The moderator, the Rev. Al Andrews, called the meeting to order and Earle German, representative from Zion Hill Church, brought devotions.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved and the treasurer's report showed a balance in the checking account of \$2,718.78 and, after the deposit of \$1,851.44 from the sale of stock given to the association, the balance in the Camp Fund Account is \$7,357.80. Total expenses for the World Missions Revival were \$4,766.71. This was paid and there was enough for an honorarium of \$59.16 for each missionary.

Announcement was made that Welcome Home Church has called a new pastor—the Rev. Cecil Wilkes from Wendell, N. C.

The Director of Missions made the following announcements:

1. The music school held in March was the largest ever conducted in Southern Baptist territory. The state staff was most complimentary.

2. The missionary personnel were most appreciative for the hospitality shown them during the World Missions Revival. They spoke to 9,309 people in churches and 4,654 in the schools. This was the largest missionary-school child contact ever.

3. Ten associational leaders will be attending the Key Leader Conference at Ridgecrest May 14-16 and an Associational Key Leader Conference will be held on May 21.

4. The association is committed to resort ministry for 16 weeks at KOA Campground this summer. This involves Saturday night and Sunday morning activities. There are some open dates so if any church is interested contact the associational office.

5. Beaver Creek Church will be celebrating their 200th anniversary on May 27 with a special all-day service.

At the AUGUST 6, 1979 meeting 18 people represented 11 churches. Mrs. Pearl Michael, representative from Welcome Home Church, led devotions.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved and the treasurer's report showed \$1907.29 in the checking account and \$7859.88 in the Camp Fund.

The moderator, the Rev. Al Andrews, called attention to the fact that Hinshaw Street Church is without a pastor; J. C. Shaw, pastor of Mt. Pleasant Church, recently had heart surgery; and I. V. Couch, pastor of Millers Creek Church, is to have surgery on August 14.

Finance Committee member E. W. McMurray presented the proposed budget for 1980. A motion was made by Lawrence Goodman, seconded by Paul Shoupe, that an amount be added to the budget for evangelism, to be used by the Evangelism Committee. The motion carried. Paul Shoupe made a motion that the amount be set at \$200, Lawrence Goodman seconded, and this motion carried. The budget of \$33,479.00 was then approved to be presented at the annual meeting as a joint recommendation of the Executive Committee and the Finance Committee. (Motion by Earle German, second by R. A. Call).

The moderator called for the Nominating Committee Report but no representative from that committee was present.

The Director of Missions, Bill McKinney, distributed programs for the annual meeting and discussed the following items:

1. Due to a gift of \$125 from Rex Shumate the association now has a seven-inch, stereo, reel-to-reel tape recorder/player valued at \$600. Cost to the association was \$200.

2. Attention was called to the current issue of *The Church Leader* which informs about N. C. Missions and promotes the N. C. Missions Offering September 23, 30 and October 7.

The moderator announced:

1. A preview showing of the movie "Joni", produced by World Wide Pictures, on August 31; the place to be announced

2. The pastor's family picnic on August 9 at 6 p.m. at Highland Park

3. The annual associational meeting beginning October 1 at Edgewood Church and declared the meeting adjourned.

BROTHERHOOD AND BAPTIST MEN'S REPORT

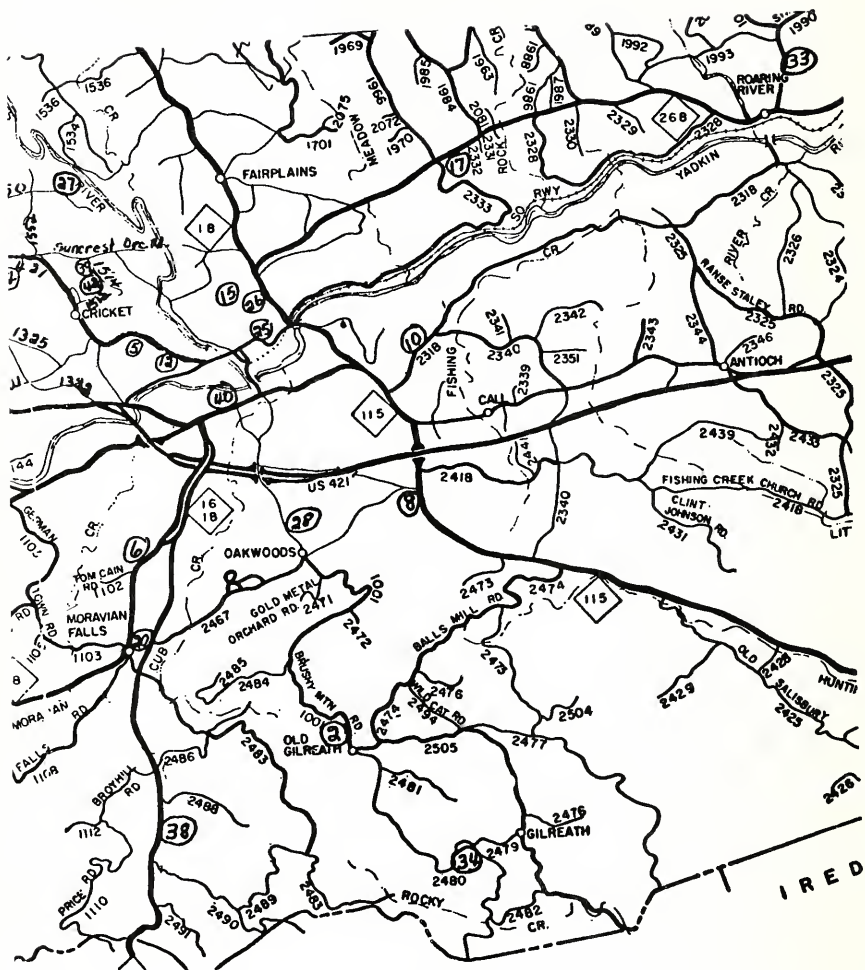

Last fall, for our Bi-vocational Pastors, we offered, through our School of Christian Studies, a week-end preview to the January Bible Study on the Book of Mark. This was taught by Rev. Paul Shoupe, pastor at Liberty Grove. There were six-to-eight pastors in attendance.

Due to the World Missions Conference in the Spring we did not try to promote any studies. We hope to have a full schedule this year. For fall 1979 we will be offering "The Pastor As A Counselor", at the associational office on Tuesday nights, Oct. 9-December 4 from 7:00-9:00 p.m. Teacher: Bill McKinney. Also for laypeople and pastors "The Christian Confronting the Cults" at Welcome Home Baptist Church; teacher to be announced.

The Spring 1980 Program, to be finalized, will include: "Counseling; School of Pastoral Care" for the pastor and "Family Life Today" on February 12-April 1.

EVANGELISM REPORT

Baptists in search of unsaved and unchurched persons, are joining together in a Statewide Evangelistic Crusade scheduled for 1982. It is expected that the effort will include Simultaneous Revivals with dates and other activities to be announced soon. The joint Evangelistic Crusade Committee, composed of both white and black Baptists, is chaired by Mark Cortis of Winston-Salem, and co-chaired by C. W. Ward of Raleigh. The committee requests prayer support of the churches for this effort to reach every person in North Carolina with the gospel of Christ by the end of 1982. Also, if this goal is to be realized each church must be responsible for each person in their community.

The 33rd Statewide Evangelism Conference was held at the Cumberland County Memorial Auditorium, Fayetteville, North Carolina, during February 5-6, 1979. Over 2,500 pastors and lay persons were challenged by evangelistic preachers to involve church members more in direct witnessing for Christ to the unsaved.

The Division of Evangelism and our Associational Office now has the TELL set and training cartridges to train small groups in direct witnessing. Our Associational Evangelism Committee will place a renewed emphasis on Lay Evangelism Schools with the use of new materials and TELL witness training. The time has come, if we are to grow as churches and reach the lost for Christ that we must go beyond our church building.

Our committee has not accomplished a great deal this associational year, but plans have been made and will be realized in the next two years. We ask you to

establish a prayer ministry in your church for the evangelistic effort of our association that we might reach our Bold Mission goals of doubling our baptisms by 1982. We will be creating such a ministry for our association on the associational level in the near future.

1. Churches need to be faithful in fulfilling their goals of mission giving and church growth;
2. Some churches may need to discover "special roles" in the bold endeavors they have adopted;
3. Church leaders must lead the people to adjust lifestyles and values in order to achieve Bold Mission Thrust;
4. We need a strong zeal and spirit of cooperation to attain the 4% of the church offering goal of our 1980 associational missions program;
5. We need a strong commitment to reach the goal for our 1980 State Cooperative Program budget by increasing church gifts by 14.87% each year until 1982.
6. We need a greater concern for people in order to bring about a new "turn around" in attitudes and records in church growth and church member development.

During the past year (1978-79) the churches of our association gave \$103,600 through the Cooperative Program.

We held the Key Leadership Conference at the Wilkesboro Baptist Church. Several of our churches were represented to discuss methods of stewardship training in the local church.

From 1969 to the present our church receipts have more than doubled. During that time mission gifts have almost tripled. The associational support has doubled. The shameful record is that the mission share of the offering plate dollar is only .15% and the associational share of the offering plate dollar is only .016%. How do we expect to carry on the Lord's work in our state and association with so poor cooperation from our churches?

We urge you to increase your giving, percent wise, each year by 14.87%. By following this plan we shall meet all goals and glorify God by following Bold Missions objectives.

Your Missions Committee is charged with the responsibility of working with the Director of Missions in extending the Christian witness throughout the associational area and to advise with him in matters pertaining to his work activities. Support of the new State Missions Offering concept is another challenge facing our churches and association. The change to the one offering will strengthen the Cooperative Program. Let's all join together in helping to make the Brushy Mountain Association a leader in contributing to this important mission offering.

Let us individually and cooperatively pledge our continued support to our Director of Missions and join him in creative and relevant ministry in our association this coming year.

STATE MISSIONS REPORT

1979 is the first year in which six special offerings are combined into the North Carolina Missions Offering. This offering is the source of support for fifty-one vital ministries; all of which are essential to the missions mandate of our Lord, and all of which are (or should be) dear to the hearts of North Carolina Baptists. Included among these ministries are: N.C. Baptist Hospital, Homes for the Aging, Children's Homes, Christian Higher Education, and all of the special ministries by which North Carolina Baptists seek to reach more than two and one-half millions of lost persons in our state as well as to minister to such special needs as: language missions to Japanese, Spanish, Korean, Vietnamese, Chinese, and Arabic persons in North Carolina; Chaplaincy

ministries to prisons, mental institutions, college campuses, deaf persons, blind persons, and non-readers; special ministries such as pastor training through Fruitland Bible Institute, resort ministries, camp and conference centers, migrant ministries, pastor retirement, pastoral aid and church lot aid; church extension, inter-faith witness, and a host of other ministries designed to carry out the Great Commission in our own state.

We encourage each one of our congregations to do its share in order that Bold Missions in North Carolina may honor our Lord Jesus Christ. Remember the words of Jesus: "Inasmuch as you did it unto one of the least of these, ye did it unto me."

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

The accomplishments of 1978 hinged on two key involvements of the Home Mission Board: Bold Mission Thrust and Mission Service Corps.

Key cities relationships have been established with 21 major U. S. metropolitan areas.

During the past two years, the HMB and SBC groups have begun work in 156 counties, reducing the number of unentered key-county clusters to 574.

By the end of the year, more than 90 Mission Service Corps volunteers were assigned to 29 states in six program areas.

The 34th state convention formed in October. The Nevada Convention has 75 churches and 14,000 members.

Although the 1978 Annie Armstrong Easter Offering was not reached, gifts totaled 15 percent above the 1977 figure.

Evangelism was upgraded and restructured. New resources were offered in both personal and mass evangelism.

More than 1,300 chaplains are now under endorsement of the HMB, including 868 military and 465 civilian.

The church loans division committed 256 loans to churches in 25 state conventions, representing a total of \$18,114,904.

Significant accomplishments have been made in both metropolitan and rural-urban missions. Much of pioneer mission work has been absorbed by Bold Mission Thrust.

In the Church Extension Department workers began 152 church-type missions and 198 churches were constituted. New Bible study fellowships numbered 897.

In Christian social ministries, new work with the blind was begun. Eight states hurt by disaster were assisted, distributing \$55,000 in funds. There were 37 CSM-led Vacation Bible Schools in Los Angeles resulting in 750 professions of faith.

In cooperation with National Baptists more than 4,900 black church leaders participated in training conferences.

Under interfaith witness great demands were made throughout the SBC for information about religious sects, especially the Unification Church of Sun Myung Moon.

A total of 150 new language-culture ministries were established and two churches for the deaf were organized.

In 1978, more than 21,600 volunteers participated in Home Missions work.

FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

Southern Baptists initiated new work in four more countries during 1978, bringing mission involvement to a total of 94 nations. Addition of new personnel reached a new high with 350 new appointments including 181 career missionaries. Our missionary staff on January 1, 1979 totaled 2,906. The Bold Mission Thrust objective to increase the missionary staff to 5,000 by the year 2000 remains a challenge.

Baptist churches abroad that are cooperatively related to Southern Baptist work grew from 8,533 to 10,449 during 1978. Membership in these churches reached 1,214,699, growing from 1,071,922 the previous year. Baptisms totaled 94,543.

Southern Baptists responded to world hunger and to disaster needs with a total of \$1,748,000 during 1978. These funds were used in 31 countries and for a broad range of purposes. At the same time, gifts for general relief declined and many needs remain unmet.

Total gifts for Southern Baptist foreign missions in 1978 reached \$64,995,017. This exceeded the 1977 total by 12.22 per cent. Of the total received, the Cooperative Program and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering provided 91.92 per cent. Thus, the lifeline for world missions remains Cooperative Program giving (providing 42.73 per cent while Lottie Moon Christmas Offering provided 49.19 per cent). Cooperative Program funds for all convention causes exceeded the budgeted amounts by \$5,477,925. In accordance with distribution plans approved by the convention in annual session this excess provided \$1,053,909 extra for foreign missions. The 1977 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering totaled \$31,938,553.04 bringing the total contributed through this offering since 1888 to \$369,803,429. Per capita giving for foreign missions increased from \$4.43 in 1977 to \$4.93 in 1978. The 1979 budget for the Foreign Missions Board totaled \$71,181,429.

Southern Baptists remain firmly committed to the missions mandate of Luke 24:47 "...that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name among all nations."

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

Although growth in bed capacity at Baptist Hospital has leveled off at just under 700 beds, there is continuing expansion of the hospital's services.

During the past year a 38-bed rehabilitation unit has opened to offer short-term services and family instruction to the disabled. The chief beneficiaries of this program are patients with strokes, arthritis, burns, long-term casts, joint replacement surgery, brain tumors, spinal cord injuries, hand injuries, and some cardiac problems.

A new six-bed burn unit is scheduled to open soon. This unit will permit the isolation of burn patients in a location where all required services are immediately available.

An automatic clinical analyzer, the first of its kind in the state, has been acquired and put into operation. This fully automated analyzer, which uses computer technology, can perform more than 200 tests. It analyzes blood serum and body fluids and provides results in less than eight minutes. These prompt and accurate results are of particular importance in critical care areas, such as the emergency room.

Our chaplains lead worship services in Davis Chapel, which are relayed to all patient rooms by closed-circuit television. They also provide a pastoral ministry to patients, their families and to staff members; provide more than 15,000 hours of personal counselling annually; offer personal growth and enrichment events to hundreds of clergy and lay persons each year; and conduct the largest program of clinical pastoral education in the world.

In recent months the hospital's oldest building—"Old Main"—has been torn down and a new six-story Focus Building is now rising on this site.

Our hospital staff members have been working with representatives from other denominational agencies and with leaders of the Baptist State Convention to promote the North Carolina Missions Offering. The hospital looks forward to receiving its share of this offering, as gifts from the churches in the fiscal year ending June 30 were \$196,516, as compared to \$388,122 in the preceding fiscal year.

HOMES FOR THE AGING REPORT

This has been a year of great significance and celebration in the life of our North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging!

Of outstanding importance has been the completion, dedication, and occupancy of our new Western N. C. Baptist Home, in Asheville. This lovely new Home, accommodating 50 additional residents, was dedicated to the glory of God on April 29. Already, there are enough residents who have arrived, and those who have been approved for admission, to fill the Home.

The new apartment complex in Winston-Salem, accommodating 16, has been completed and all of the apartments have either been filled or assigned. With an older apartment, built in 1961, there are a total of five duplex apartments, accommodating 20 persons. With the apartment complex, the six Baptist Homes for the Aging, and the skilled nursing facility, 300 persons can be served in our Baptist Homes. Homes are located in the following places: Resthaven, the Hayes Home, Apartments, The Skilled Nursing Unit, in Winston-Salem; the Albemarle Home, in Albemarle; the Hamilton Home in Hamilton; the Yanceyville Home, in Yanceyville; the Western North Carolina Baptist Home, in Asheville.

Financially, this has been a crucial year in our Baptist Homes, since we did not have our usual 3rd Sunday of February Offering, which makes up 16% of our total budget. We have had to move into our endowment funds in order to operate and to keep the ship afloat. Let us trust that the goal of \$2,000,000 for all of our ten Baptist Institutions, and the special causes of State Missions, will be met.

Support through the Cooperative Program for our Homes, which supplies about 8% of our total budget continues in a steady and encouraging manner. During the 28 years of the ministry of the Homes, however, the amount of 1 2/10% of the Baptist State Convention Cooperative dollar for the Homes has never been changed.

Ministry to an older person is a ministry as unto Christ Himself. We trust that you will keep this vital ministry close to your heart and in your prayers, and that your gifts will enable us not only to minister to those in our care, but encourage us to expand this desperately needed ministry in our Convention.

CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

Throughout its history, the ministry of the Children's Homes has been characterized as Christ-centered, church-centered and child-centered. In recent years added attention has been given to the child and his family. Societal changes are demanding greater attention to a variety of services to families within their own communities. Concurrent with these changes, we are experiencing significant variations within the Baptist denomination. All these factors have a direct bearing upon the support structure of the Homes.

The majority of the children served during the past year have responded well to the opportunities for growth and development which have been provided for them. Frugality has been exercised in the use of the resources that were provided with which to work. Congenial relationships have been maintained with clients, institutions, governmental agencies and supporting friends.

The lives of more than 4,175 people were affected in a significant way by the services of the Children's Homes during the past year. The Homes provided care and related services for 1,440. Of this number 1,140 received continuing services while 340 received casework, counseling and referral services. Applications for 79 children were in process of evaluation at the end of the year.

Through members of the staff, a close working relationship was maintained with 2,222 adults while working with the children. Consultant services were provided more than 400 adults through Child Development and Family Education services.

The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, in its 1977 Annual Meeting, voted to request the Children's Homes to develop a three year pilot program to serve mentally retarded adults. A committee from the Board of Trustees has engaged in a constructive study of services needed for this population in North Carolina. It is anticipated that a home will be provided for a small number of mildly retarded adults during 1979.

CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION REPORT

When North Carolina Baptists call the college/university roll, there are seven reasons to be grateful and proud: Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, Meredith, Wake Forest and Wingate. These are seven of 53 colleges and universities supported and nurtured by state conventions within the Southern Baptist Convention.

According to the latest figures printed by the Education Commission, SBC, of the 134,000 students attending the 53 Baptist colleges in the Convention,

almost 20,000 are enrolled in our North Carolina schools. Thus, 15% of all Baptist college enrollments are located in this state.

The 1978-79 year witnessed change and progress. Enrollments were stable; budgets were balanced; Wingate College made history by graduating the first senior class; Campbell, once known as a senior college, announced a name change to Campbell University; the Campbell Law School graduated its first class; and churches all across the state answered the Council's request for names and addresses of prospective college students. In the main, it was a very good year for Baptist colleges.

We thank you for supporting the colleges. We call upon the churches to pray for all of our Baptist work, including the colleges. We look toward the crucial decisions in the fall with confidence in North Carolina Baptists, who have been supporting Christian higher education for almost 150 years.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

The year 1978 was a "banner year" and a year of challenge for the Annuity Board in servicing churches and agencies of the Southern Baptist Convention, according to D. Darold H. Morgan, president.

Among the challenges he listed were extremes of market variations, staggering pressures of escalating costs, changes in personnel and organization, and the eroding presence of governmental regulations.

The banner side highlights included:

1. A "13th check" equalling an additional full month's benefit and amounting to \$1,036,914 was mailed to almost 10,000 annuitants in Board retirement programs.

2. A total of \$25,558,637 was paid in retirement and protection benefits. Insurance benefits through church, agency and seminarian programs topped \$13 million.

3. An Endowment Department, designed to seek funds for undergirding protection programs, was established. A goal of \$25 million by 1988 was set.

4. New churches in the retirement program numbered 630, a record enrollment. New pastors and church employees totaled 2,545, with 3,721 members upgraded programs.

5. Participants in the new Southern Baptist Retirement Program grew to 6,066.

6. Premium income reached \$51,797,996 (includes relief). Total assets climbed to \$569,734,471, compared with \$498,977,661 a year earlier.

In North Carolina as of March 31, 1979, 2,953 staff members of 2,290 churches and associations are participating in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program.

In the Brushy Mountain Association 26 churches and 30 staff members are participating in the retirement program.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

Increases in Scripture distribution were dramatic in many areas of the world. Total Scripture distribution throughout 1978 by all of the Societies cooperating with United Bible Societies reached 503,125,210 Bibles. New Testaments, Portions and selections...23 percent over 1977.

The Scriptures were distributed in many continents and countries of the world during 1978: Africa, Asia, Latin America, Europe, North America; some for the first time in many, many years. Russia permitted the distribution of 25,000 Bibles. The door in China looks as if it will also open. God grant that it will open the way for this great work.

This is why the American Bible Society is excited that over five million Scriptures were distributed in 1978. The seed is being sown, and continues to fall on good soil over and over again.

During 1978 more than 33,400 American Bible Society Volunteers shared Scriptures with people in churches, hospitals, nursing homes, and business establishments, prisons, etc.

Thousands served in local churches as American Bible Society representatives, operating more than 2,640 Scripture Courtesy Centers in the United States.

The American Bible Society requests the prayers and financial support of their work. Working together we can bring the message of hope to those who need it so desperately.

In its 146th year of serving North Carolina Baptists, the *Recorder*, like old man river, keeps rolling along. The *Recorder* faced the same problems as everyone did in the past year—price increases in every phase of its operations. The cost of postage continues to go up at a rate of more than 30 per cent a year. This means the *Recorder* is costing four times as much to mail as it did five years ago.

Paper and printing also have gone up, but despite these increases, the *Recorder* is still about the most reasonable publication available. By keeping the staff small and cutting corners wherever possible, the *Recorder* can still go into every home in a church for only 7 ½ cents a week. In today's inflationary world, where else can a person receive so much for so little money? You would pay twice that much for postage on a first class letter.

This has been a newsworthy year and the *Recorder* has tried to keep you informed. Wake Forest University and its relationship to the Baptist State Convention continues to be in the news and you can depend on the *Recorder* to strive for fairness and responsible coverage. Action will be taken at the State Convention in November on a proposal that has been worked out by a special committee.

Even though the *Recorder* takes pride in its coverage of denominational news and events, it devoted more space to the local church than any other state paper in the Southern Baptist Convention. The *Recorder* believes in the local church as the foundation stone of what we are trying to do together as Southern Baptists. Strong churches result in a strong denomination.

The editor is completing 20 years and is still striving to make the *Recorder* better each week. Your support of the *Recorder* will not only mean much to it but will make you a stronger and better informed Christian. If you and your church do not receive the *Recorder*, please take steps immediately to see that this is done.

BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

Since January 1, 1979, the Foundation staff with the assistance from Rev. James B. McQuere, retired Director of Missions of the South Fork Baptist Association, has made an intensive effort to familiarize as many pastors as possible with the helpful services provided by the Baptist State Convention through the North Carolina Baptist Foundation. The Foundation is available to assist individual Baptists with their estate planning, regardless of the size of the estate. Many of the most significant and meaningful gifts to support the Christian ministries through the denomination have been directed through the Foundation as trustee. These services are available from the trained staff and their professional support (accounting and legal services) employed for this purpose without cost to individual participants. Where an individual desires to be a part of sharing the gospel beyond his or her lifetime, the establishment of a trust with the Foundation provides a tangible participation in such activities.

The Foundation has been actively engaged in assisting individuals in not only having their Wills redrafted, but also in the preparation and establishment of annuity trusts. Through such a trust, an individual or couple can place in trust assets (such as property, cash or securities) and receive income for the remainder of their lives. After death, the income from the trust will be paid to the donor's choice(s) of Baptist missions work and/or institution. This method of giving provides the satisfying knowledge of being a faithful steward in utilizing resources more completely for the Lord's ministries, as well as, taking advantage of the laws of our land in reducing taxation on resources—both income and estates.

CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE REPORT

The League is pleased to make this report, grateful for the support which you have given and happy to mention some decisions which affect the social climate of our state and the moral fiber of our people.

The Supreme Court of the State of North Carolina has ruled the anti-pornography bill constitutional. Better known as the Lake Bill, it is ready to be enforced by sheriffs, police chiefs and district attorneys.

The Court of Appeals of the State of North Carolina will hand down a ruling soon on the challenge to the liquor-by-the-drink legislation passed by the 1978 session of the assembly. This suit was filed in Wake Superior Court in January and the decision by Judge Pou Bailey has been appealed to the Appeals Court. A brief has been filed and the next step is to present arguments before the court. Our attorney feels that we have a good chance of winning the case, but the only thing to do now is wait. The League has discovered that law suits are time-consuming and expensive. We need your prayers and your financial support in this matter.

The North Carolina Senate, in a last-day move, passed a bill which under certain conditions will give cities and towns a chance to vote after the county has voted to turn down liquor-by-the-drink. This will undermine the basic philosophy which underlies the passage of the original L-B-D bill. Since this bill has passed the Senate, it can be considered by the House in the short session to be held in June, 1980. We need to secure commitments from our representatives that they will oppose the bill, which is Senate Bill No. 943.

A decision (vote) by the members of the Senate of North Carolina killed a bill which would have relaxed the penalties for the possession of up to four ounces of marijuana. We rejoice in this victory.

On May 1 of this year, Brother Coy Privette became the full-time Associate Executive Director of the League. Continue to pray for the directors, the officers, the trustees and expand the support which you are giving the League.

HISTORY OF HARMONY BAPTIST CHURCH

The 1951 edition of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association annual contains a brief history of Harmony Baptist Church from 1900-1951. This historical period is from year 1952-1980.

Following is a list of the ministers who have served Harmony Baptist Church and the time period: Rev. Rex West, 1951-52; Rev. M.L. Blevins, 1952-56; Rev. Clyde Church, 1956-61; Rev. Fred Miller, 1961-69; Rev. Jim Weaver (interim), 1969-70; and Rev. Monroe Huffman, 1970-now serving.

The following ministers have been ordained since 1951: Rev. Michael Almond in 1965, Rev. Amos Combs in 1966, Rev. Burl Faw in 1969, and Rev. James Weaver in 1969.

Current church officers now serving are: Rev. Monroe Huffman - Pastor, Mr. Jake Hamby, Jr. - Chairman of Deacons, Mr. Jerry Durham - Church Clerk, Mrs. James Finney - Treasurer, Mrs. Jerry Durham - Pianist, Mr. James Finney - Sunday School Superintendent.

In 1960 an educational building containing 13 Sunday School rooms, 2 baths, baptistry, and pastor's study was built. In 1962 the church voted to have full-time services. The church debt was paid in full and an organ was

purchased. In 1963 a new sanctuary, size 36' x 60' was built for \$18,500. The parking lot was paved in 1965 and in 1966 the debt for the new sanctuary was paid in full and a note burning held. In 1968 a new furnace was purchased for the educational building. An indirect lighting system was installed in the sanctuary in 1969 and an adding machine and riding lawn mower were purchased. Also a picnic shelter was built.

In 1972 the sanctuary and educational building were air conditioned. A church van was bought in 1973 and the church sponsored the pastor on a tour of the Holy Land. In 1975 the church voted to put the pastor on the field full-time. The parking lot was repaved with parking lanes painted.

In 1976 the sanctuary was completely remodeled with ceiling being lowered, new wall-to-wall carpet, pew cushions, walls repainted, and picture painted in the baptistry. New furniture was purchased for the nursery; Coat rack and umbrella stand were bought; outdoor carpet installed on front and side entrances. The hallways in the educational building were carpeted, an outdoor lighted sign installed, and beautification of the grounds included electricity and water at the picnic shelter

In 1978 solid wood doors for the outside of the sanctuary and educational building were installed. Outside of the sanctuary and the steeple were repainted and a more spacious ladies bathroom was added. A hot water heater was installed and additional insulation was put in.

In 1979 chimes were installed and a PA system in the sanctuary with intercom in the hallway and nursery. The educational building was updated with wall-to-wall carpet, new drapery rods and draperies, chalk and bulletin boards, and a new vacuum cleaner and calculator were purchased. The entire church building was re-roofed.

The church has just begun a study of "Through the Bible in One Year."

As reported in the 1951 annual, Harmony has continued to stress the importance of her members attending all services on a regular basis and to give liberally to help spread the gospel. Fifteen percent of her annual budget is designated for missions. The unselfish giving of her members has enabled her to remain debt free since 1966. Fiscal 1979-80 has been a record year for total offerings. Although the church has not attained the level of attendance she enjoyed in the mid-1960's, the Lord has blessed her with faithful, dedicated members. Attendance of Sunday night worship services and Wednesday night Bible study is almost equal to the average Sunday School Attendance.

Constitution

ARTICLE I—NAME

This body shall be known as the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association of North Carolina.

ARTICLE II—PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this association to consider and promote measures for increasing the harmony, the knowledge and the spiritual life of the churches and for developing and directing their energies and their contributions in the advancement of Christ's kingdom throughout the earth, always in harmony with the teachings of the New Testament. This association shall be an auxiliary to the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in all their missionary, educational and benevolent work.

ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches desiring to affiliate with it. Each church may be represented in the annual associational meetings by its pastor and any other ordained ministers holding membership in it. In addition to these, each church may elect three (3) messengers for the first one hundred (100) members or major fraction thereof, plus one additional messenger for each additional one hundred (100) members or major fraction thereof, provided that no church shall be entitled to send more than ten (10) messengers.

Section 2. Any church desiring to become a member of the association shall present through messengers chosen for that purpose, its request for membership on APPLICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP provided in the minutes along with a UNIFORM ASSOCIATIONAL LETTER provided by the clerk at any

annual session of the body. The Moderator shall refer the church to the Committee on New Churches for study and investigation. The church maintains for the year the status of associate membership until the committee makes its recommendation, if favorable, it will be received into full membership with all the rights and privileges at the next annual session. If the association then votes to receive the church, the moderator shall extend the hand of fellowship to the messengers.

Section 3. Any church not representing itself in this body for two successive years, either by letter or by messengers shall be stricken from the roll of churches, unless satisfactory reasons for such failure are given.

Section 4. The association shall withdraw fellowship from any church in its membership which shall be found to be disorderly in faith and practice, but not until written charges are brought against it, which charges shall have been authorized by the official act of the church offering the same. Thereafter, any such charges shall be carefully considered by the association.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. The officers of the association shall consist of a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Director of Music Ministry, School of Christian Studies Director, Director of Evangelism, Librarian and Representatives for the following BIBLICAL RECORDER, Baptist Hospital, Children's Homes, Homes for the Aging, Christian Higher Education, Annuity Board, American Bible Society, Home Missions, State Missions and Foreign Missions. These shall be elected annually on the second day of the annual session before the noon recess adjournment by a majority of the members voting and shall begin their term of office upon final adjournment of the session at which elected and shall continue in office until the close of the next annual session. Any officer may succeed himself, except the Moderator, who may not serve more than two years in succession.

The Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Brotherhood Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director and Director of Evangelism, will be elected at the Executive Committee Meeting in August. After their election they will become a part of the Nominating Committee.

Section 2. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, preserve order, appoint all committees not otherwise provided for, and exercise all other duties of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. He shall also, as far as his private duties may permit, visit and communicate with the churches between the sessions of the association to encourage and assist them in their work for the kingdom. He shall appoint a Nominating Committee and Committee on Committees at the annual meeting to serve for the following year. He shall be chairman of the Executive Committee and ex officio member of all other committees.

Section 3. The Vice-Moderator shall discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence or at his request, and be Vice Chairman of the Executive Committee.

Section 4. The Clerk shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the association; shall superintend their printing and distribution to the churches; shall send one copy each to the General Secretary of the Baptist State

Convention, the Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn., the American Baptist Publication Society, Philadelphia, Pa., and to our denominational agencies or institutions requesting them; shall preserve a file of all association records; shall provide at least one month prior to the annual session of the association, form letters for the use of the churches in making their reports to the association and shall suggest to each church, based on the actual cost of printing, the amount needed for the printing and distribution of the Annual. He shall serve as Secretary of the Executive Committee.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all funds of the association, as directed by the association, and make an itemized statement at each annual session.

Section 6. The Historian, in his sole discretion, shall collect facts of interest to the association and the cooperating churches, and shall make a report to each annual session of the association.

Section 7. The Trustees shall be three in number. It shall be their duty to hold in trust any property, endowment or other securities of this association, and to be representative of the association in legal matters.

ARTICLE V—COMMITTEES AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. At each annual session of the association the Moderator shall appoint a Nominating Committee composed of three members from as many different churches. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate and present to the association at its next annual session a complete slate of officers and institutional representatives. After presentation of these nominations the Moderator shall give opportunity for nominations from the floor for any and all of these positions. Should vacancies occur by death or resignation, it shall be the duty of the committee to name a person to fill the vacant position until the next annual session of the association, with the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. At each annual session of the association, the moderator shall appoint a Committee on Committees composed of seven members from as many different churches. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate and present to the association at its next annual session, members of all standing committees not otherwise provided for in this constitution. Should vacancies occur by death or resignation, it shall be the duty of this committee to name a person to fill the vacant position until the next annual session of the association, with the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE shall consist of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Sunday School Director, Associational Church Training Director, Director of Music Ministry, Associational W.M.U. Director, Associational Brotherhood Director and all the pastors of churches within the association together with one member from each church to be elected by the church. A quorum shall consist of ten (10) members of the committee, including four of the above mentioned officers, providing that either the Moderator or Vice-Moderator is present. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to cooperate with the Baptist State Convention and with the churches of the association in the promotion of any plans which may seem wise for the extension of Christ's kingdom, and to take such steps as may be necessary to put into successful operation any plans adopted by the association. The committee shall meet at least once each quarter at a time to be

agreed upon or at the call of the Moderator. The officers of the association shall be the officers of the committee with the Moderator serving as chairman.

Section 4. THE ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of the associational Sunday School Director, the associational Church Training Director, the association Director of Music Ministry, the associational W.M.U. Director, the associational Brotherhood Director and three pastors, who along with the chairman, shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees. It shall be the duty of this committee to cooperate with the associational Director of Missions in the extension of Baptist work throughout the associational area, and advise with him in matters pertaining to his work and activities. It shall also be the duty of the committee, in the event of a vacancy in the position of associational Director of Missions, to seek out and recommend to the Executive Committee or the association, a suitable person. It shall be the further duty of this committee to consult with the Finance Committee on matters of expense and to provide information to the Baptist State Convention officials which might be helpful in meeting missionary needs and to make recommendations to the association in matters of this kind.

Section 5. THE FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members with the Treasurer serving as ex officio member. It shall be the duty of this committee to plan and recommend to the Executive Committee and the association a financial budget for the coming year and to supervise the raising and expenditure of funds.

Section 6. THE COMMITTEE ON NEW CHURCHES shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to receive applications from churches seeking admission to the association and, after a visit to such churches, careful investigation and deliberation, to report to the association on such applications in keeping with the provisions of this constitution.

Section 7. THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to study and recommend any necessary change in the constitution and bring reports as necessary to the association.

Section 8. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to arrange the program for the annual session of the association and present the same for adoption at its opening session. The Moderator and Director of Missions will serve as special advisors on this committee.

Section 9. PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to receive or solicit invitations for the place of meeting and to recommend to the annual session a place or places of meeting, preacher, and an alternate for such sermons or sermon to be presented in the discretion of the committee and the dates of the next annual session.

Section 10. THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duty it shall be to study and report on such resolutions as may be referred to it and to present such other resolutions as may be appropriate at the annual session.

Section 11. THE COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL SERVICE AND CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS shall be composed of three members from as many different churches whose duty it shall be to study the social and civic problems of our area, along with relevant literature available through the Christian Life Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention, and to report to the annual

session of the association their findings along with recommendations for specific action by the association and/or cooperating churches.

Section 12. THE STEWARDSHIP AND COOPERATIVE PROGRAM COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members whose duties it shall be to encourage each church to teach and practice Bible stewardship, to give to associational missions, and to support world mission causes through the Cooperative Program.

Section 13. THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM, composed of three members shall promote the work of evangelism in the association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs to be subject to the approval of the association or its Executive Committee.

Section 14. THE CALENDAR COMMITTEE shall be composed of the following associational officers: Director of Missions, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, W.M.U. Director, Brotherhood Director, Director of Music Ministry, and president of the Minister's Conference. This committee shall prepare an associational calendar for the year, and present same to the annual meeting, for adoption. This calendar shall be included in the annual.

Section 15. THE COMMITTEE ON ORDINATION, composed of seven ministers, shall, when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of candidates for the Gospel Ministry. Churches wishing to ordain ministers are requested to place their candidates before the committee at least thirty (30) days prior to the date set for ordination for examination on the following principles:

- a. Christian experience or conversion
- b. Call to the Ministry
- c. Attitude toward denominational work and objects
- d. Support of denominational causes
- e. Moral and spiritual fitness
- f. Doctrinal beliefs
- g. Knowledge of the Bible

Candidates are to be ordained with the assistance of this committee only when they are serving a church or churches as pastor or having been called as a pastor of a Baptist church of like faith and practice with those member churches of this association.

No candidate for ordination shall be considered by the committee who has not been a member of a cooperating church for at least one year.

Candidates are to be urged to prepare themselves for the ministry as far as possible in Baptist Institutions of Higher Learning.

This committee shall not recommend any candidate for ordination whom they feel will not bring honor and esteem to the Lord, to Southern Baptists and to the BRUSHY Mountain Baptist Association.

Recommendations will be made by the committee to the church where the candidate holds membership. The committee will assist the church in the ordination service at a time convenient to the church and to the members of the committee if such assistance is desired.

Section 16. THE COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS, composed of three members, shall bring a report at the annual meeting, leading in a memorial service, in memory of those reported by the churches as deceased since the last annual meeting.

Section 17. PROPERTIES COMMITTEE. This committee shall be composed of three members and shall have the responsibility of supervision of all

properties belonging to the association and shall give attention to the condition of the properties owned by the association. This committee shall make such repairs or improvements as deemed necessary. All matters of major repairs or improvements shall be referred to the Finance Committee for action and recommendation to the Executive Committee. This committee shall make at least one inspection in each quarter of the year of all properties owned by the association.

ARTICLE VI—GENERAL PROVISIONS

Section 1. The employment of a Director of Missions shall follow the procedure outlined in Section 4, Article V, with the understanding that said person be extended an indefinite call and that a period of 30 days notice be given by either the missionary or the association in the event of termination of such employment.

Section 2. The Director of Missions, under the supervision of the Associational Missions Committee, shall be empowered to procure and supervise such necessary secretarial and janitorial personnel for the proper operation and maintenance of the associational office, provided that funds for the hiring and salary of such personnel have been included with in the current year's budget.

Section 3. All questions of order not herein provided for shall be decided according to ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER, Revised.

Section 4. Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any annual session upon vote of two-thirds of the members present, provided that such amendments be presented on the first day of the annual session and voted upon the second day.

Section 5. ROTATING OF COMMITTEES. One-third of each committee shall be elected to serve a period of three years. Committees or parts of committees, composed of organizational heads shall not be subject to rotation. No member shall succeed himself. Vacancies occurring during the year may be filled immediately by the Executive Committee.

Section 6. SPECIAL ADVISORS. The Moderator and Director of Admissions will serve on all committees of the association as special advisors.

Bylaws

1. The association shall convene annually on the first Monday in October and continue through the first Tuesday in October or longer in the judgement of the Committee on Order of Business and subject to the approval of the association.

2. Each session of the association shall be opened with religious exercise, conducted by whomsoever the Committee on Order of Business may designate.

3. A majority of the members present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of any business except the matter of making changes in the Constitution.

4. Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator, shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration, and avoid the use of unnecessary personalities.

5. The members shall observe toward the officers and towards one another such courtesies as are becoming to Christians.

6. The annual associational year, for the purpose of reporting statistical information shall be September 1 to August 31, inclusive.

7. Amendments to the By-Laws may be made by a majority vote of members present at any annual meeting of the association.

PROCEEDINGS

of the

One Hundred Ninth Annual Meeting

1. The 109th annual meeting of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association was called to order by the moderator, Rev. Alfred Andrews, at 4 p.m. on October 6, 1980 at Roaring River Baptist Church.

2. Associational Music Director Craig Little led the congregation in singing "Onward, Christian Soldiers" with Mrs. Pat Faw at the organ and Mrs. Gwen Stinson at the piano.

3. Welcome was extended by Rev. Bill Pardue, pastor of Roaring River Church.

4. The Rev. Alan Richey, Minister of Education and Youth at North Wilkesboro, First Church, read scripture from Romans 8:35-39 and led in prayer.

5. The report of the Committee on Order of Business was presented by Rev. L.J. Culler and was adopted as printed in the Book of Reports (Hereinafter BOR).

6. The moderator appointed the Nominating Committee for 1980-81 as follows: Paul Holbrook, Chairman; Miss Betty Mikeal; and Eddie L. Minton. Mr. Andrews also appointed the Committee on Committees to be made up of Conley Call, chairman; Robert Wood; Robert Morgan; Rev. Alan Richey; Mrs. Paris Kilby; Mrs. Duane Kuykendall; and Mrs. David Love.

7. The Camp Development Committee Report, page 18 BOR, was presented by Bill McKinney for Max Freeman. A road has been graded on the property and is expected to be graveled soon before any other work can be done.

8. The Committee on Committees Report was given by Anse Church who moved its adoption as printed on page 9 BOR. The motion carried.

9. Bill Sturdivant brought the recommendation of the Committee on Dedication of Annuals that the 1980 annual be dedicated to the Rev. J.C. Shaw who held the longest pastorate in the association (17 years at Mount Pleasant Church) prior to his death in March, 1980. The recommendation was approved by a standing vote. Mr. Sturdivant read a tribute to Mr. Shaw and the moderator called attention to a poem of tribute printed in the BOR written by Kelly Bond, an Acteen at Mount Pleasant Church.

10. The Executive Committee Report, page 10 BOR, was given by Moderator Alfred Andrews who urged greater attendance at the committee meetings and support for the new moderator.

13. Coy Privette spoke concerning activities of the Christian Action League. He distributed a legislative questionnaire to those present.

15. Associational Clerk Norma Jean Wood read the historical events in the churches during the past year and called attention to the honor clerks.

17. Special music was presented by Nancy Land who sang "Tell Them of Jesus Today" accompanied by Gwen Stinson.

18. The Rev. Rex Shumate, pastor of Edgewood Baptist Church, brought a message using scripture from Colossians 4:2-6.

19. The invocation and invitation to the evening meal was given by Rev. Bill Pardue.

20. The session was reconvened with the singing of the hymn "Love Lifted Me."

21. Rev. Bill Pardue read scripture from Ephesians 4:1-6 and led in prayer.

22. The moderator introduced new pastors in the association: Rev. Robert D. Wilson and his wife Harriet from Hinshaw Street Church, Rev. Duane Kuykendall and his wife Debbie from Moravian Falls Church, and Rev. Dean Dillard and his wife Reba from Fishing Creek Church. Rev. Bill Russell and his wife Regina from Gordon Church were not present.

Mr. Andrews also asked for prayer for the four churches in the association who are now without pastors.

23. The treasurer's report was given by Norma Jean Wood and adopted as printed on page 13 BOR.

24. Harold Triplett presented the Finance Committee Report. His motion to accept the budget, totaling \$37,171.00, as printed on page 14 BOR was passed.

25. The Associational Missions Report, page 21 BOR, was given by Rev. Lawrence Goodman, who called upon Rev. Duane Kuykendall, Rev. Sherrill Welborn and Ray Fulbert to share experiences of their missions group trips to Maryland during the past summer.

26. Attention was called to the State Missions Report, page 21 BOR, the Home Missions Report, page 22 BOR, and the Foreign Missions Report, page 22 BOR. A filmstrip about State Missions was shown, and a video-tape with messages concerning State, Home, and Foreign Missions was also shown.

27. The congregation joined in singing the hymn "There is a Name I Love to Hear".

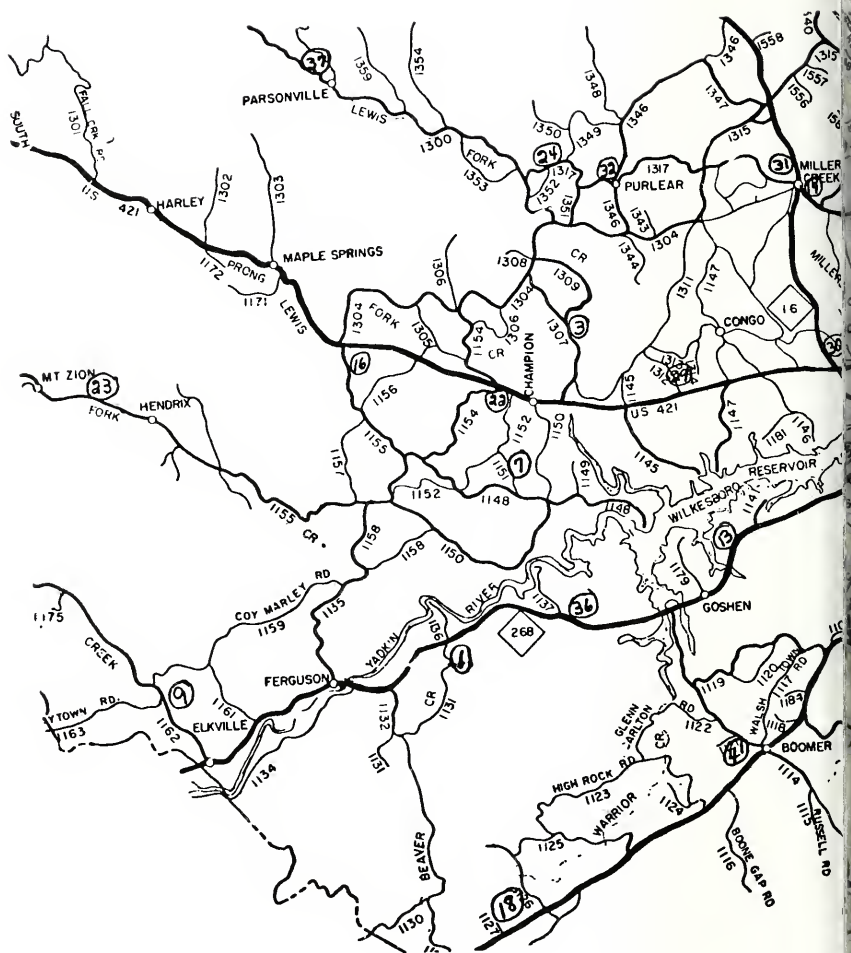

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS' REPORT

This associational year has been a very busy and productive one for your director of missions. Much time and effort have been expended in planning and coordinating the major projects of the association. The three-year evangelism plan for Brushy Mountain Baptist Association has been a thrilling challenge of work and we are well along with the task of bringing that plan toward realization. The Wilkes Evangelism Crusade activities have presented an opportunity to be real and effective in missioning within our own county. We expect associational involvement in this activity to continue at a very high level. Our cooperative relationship with Baptists in western Maryland has proven to be a very rewarding part of our ministry. Four groups shared some ministry in Maryland this year with seven churches participating by sending volunteers. We anticipate that this ministry will continue next summer and perhaps for several years. The ministry has been well received in Maryland and has brought an infusion of joy through service into those churches which provided volunteers.

In addition to these major projects the routine work of your director of missions has gone on. The following is a very brief digest of *some* of those activities. It has been my privilege to work very closely with pastor search committees from seven of our churches. At the present time we still have six congregations searching for pastors. During the year I have consulted with twenty-five pastors concerning various kinds of needs in their churches and/or their personal lives. I have consulted with four deacon bodies at their request concerning matters of vital interest. I have been privileged on eight occasions to meet with and assist program leaders within the churches to deal with organizational matters or to help them re-vitalize their programs of work. I have served two brief interim pastorates until an interim pastor could be called. In addition to these opportunities I have preached twenty-one messages in twelve churches as pastor supply and conducted one week of revival services. Nine other churches have been visited during worship and ten during Sunday School. Many hours have been spent in pastoral counseling with laymen and families from our churches. Twelve individuals and seven couples or families

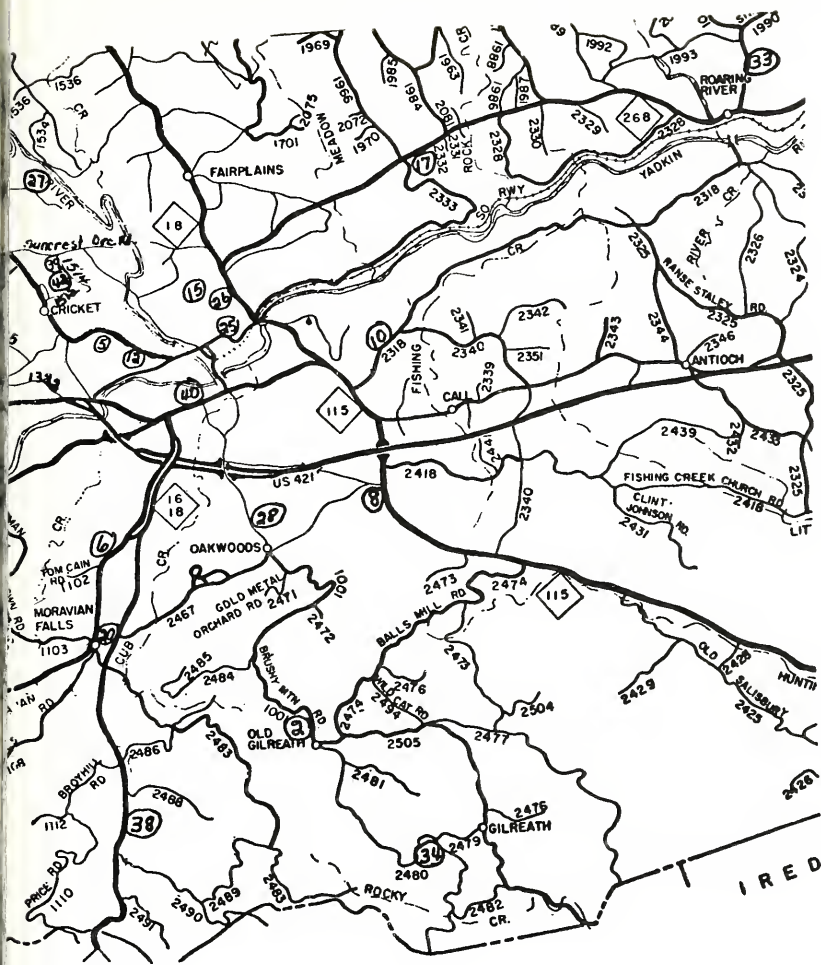

have been involved in continuing crisis or problem counseling over a period of several weeks or months. I have had the privilege to share in four anniversary celebration services and have brought messages in two of these celebrations. I taught one Bible course and spoke in one World Missions Conference.

I am especially grateful for the fact that we were able to arrange for and carry through a course in pastoral ministry at Wilkes General Hospital. This course was partially funded by N.C. Baptist State Convention and was co-sponsored by Wilkes General Hospital, Brushy Mountain Baptist Association, N.C. Baptist State Convention, and Wilkes Ministerial Association. It was taught by faculty members from N.C. Baptist Hospital School of Pastoral Care.

In addition to the above activities it has been my privilege to serve as president of Wilkes CARES, Inc., as secretary of Wilkes Ministerial Association, as secretary/treasurer of the N.C. Director of Missions Conference, as a member of the New River Mental Health Board, and as secretary of Wilkes Day Care Center. In addition to the every Saturday radio program (The Brushy Mountain Baptist Association Hour) I have conducted three weeks of morning devotions on WKBC and have conducted devotional services at Vespers Nursing Home and Foster-Richardson Nursing Home.

Please allow me to express my gratitude for the opportunity of ministering among you. Let me also express gratitude for associational officers and committee members who take their responsibilities seriously and who have served with dedication and distinction. Remember to pray daily for the ministry of Brushy Mountain Baptist Association and for your associational staff.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The following highlights are from the Executive Committee meetings. The Executive Committee met four times during the associational year. A total of 84 people representing 49 churches were present. The average attendance at the meetings was 21 people from 12 churches.

The November meeting was called to order by the moderator, the Rev. Larry Bradley. Organizational reports were shared from the Church Training, Brotherhood, Evangelism and Music Directors.

The February meeting was called to order by the Rev. Lawrence Goodman, chairman of the Missions Committee. Harold Hayes, Chairman of the Committee on Committees, brought a recommendation that Clate Miller be elected to fill a two-year term on the Evangelism Committee to replace Larry Bradley who moved away. Curtis Greene seconded and the motion carried.

The Rev. Kendall Hatton, Chairman of the Nominating Committee brought recommendations that the Rev. Al Andrews fill out the unexpired term as moderator, Dr. John T. Wayland serve as Director of the School of Christian Studies (both replacing Larry Bradley), Lillian Foster - Baptist Women Director (replacing Betsy Bradley), and Barbara McKenzie - Baptist Young Women Director. Seconded by Craig Little, the motion passed.

Evangelism Chairman Lawrence Goodman announced that the Brushy Mountain Association Evangelism Committee has joined with other associations to make a joint effort in the county.

The Missions Committee regrets that snow forced the postponement of the visit of the group from Maryland. That visit is now tentatively set for March 22-23.

The treasurer's report showed \$4,288.98 in the checking account and \$8,447.88 in the Camp Fund account.

Dr. McKinney encouraged study of the book, "N.C. Baptists Working Together" by Susan Ray and Frances Riley.

The Rev. E.W. McMurray introduced the new pastor at Moravian Falls Church, the Rev. Duane Kuykendall.

The Rev. Goodman called attention to the three churches in the association who are without pastors and asked that they be remembered in prayer.

The May meeting was opened with A.K. Foster, representative from Lewis Fork Church, reading Ephesians 3 and leading in prayer. The treasurer reported \$3,930.04 in the checking account.

Nominating Committee Chairman, the Rev. Kendall Hatton distributed a list of recommendations for officers for 1980-81. Duane Kuykendall was elected to fill out this year as Sunday School Director. The motion that these listed officers be recommended to the annual meeting was passed.

Evangelism Chairman Lawrence Goodman discussed the Three-Year Evangelism Plan for Wilkes County: to "saturate the county with the gospel of Christ."

Costs for the 1980 mailouts is expected to be about \$4,000. Each church will be asked to give 50¢ per resident member or \$50. per church. The Executive Committee voted to support this three-year effort which has the endorsement of the Pastor's Conference.

Director of Missions Dr. Bill McKinney, announced that Fishing Creek Church has called the Rev. Dean Dillard to be their pastor and that May 19-25 is Associational Emphasis Week. Posters and bulletin covers publicizing this event were distributed and prayer was requested for the specific items each day as listed in the associational newsletter.

A dinner meeting will be held on May 9 at Oakwoods Church with representatives from the Annuity Board.

Mr. McKinney reported that 36 people represented 19 churches at the day meeting of the 150th anniversary rally on April 28.

Bill Owens, representative from New Hope Church, opened the August meeting with scripture and prayer. The treasurer reported \$4,903.50 cash on hand and \$9,209.49 in the Camp Fund.

The Nominating Committee Chairman, the Rev. Kendall Hatton, recommended Mrs. Judy Sams for Church Training Director and Mrs. Belinda Miles for W.M.U. Director. The motion passed that these officers be recommended to the annual meeting. Missions Committee Chairman, the Rev. Lawrence Goodman, gave a report at the mission trip to Maryland.

The 1980-81 budget of \$37,171.00 was adopted for presentation to the annual meeting.

SCHOOL OF CHRISTIAN STUDIES REPORT

Seminary Extension is a movement born out of an expressed need within Southern Baptist life for ministry training opportunities beyond the college or seminary campus. Its goal is to bring continuing theological education within reach of ministers and lay church leaders, regardless of age, geographical location, or level of formal educational background. More than 10,000 persons currently are enrolled in one or more courses. Seminary Extension students are in all fifty states and a number of foreign countries. Eighty percent of these attend classes in one of the approximately 400 Seminary Extension centers.

North Carolina Baptists help underwrite the cost of study with Seminary Extension through the Cooperative Program budget. This subsidy helps keep the cost per course within a range every student can afford. This is a major

reason why our state has had the largest statewide Seminary Extension program in the United States for the sixth consecutive year.

Brushy Mountain Baptist Association's School of Christian Studies has offered three courses during the associational year. PM 28, *The Pastor As A Counselor*, was taught to eight students in the fall quarter of 1979. At the same time the course *Confronting The Cults* was taught with twenty-seven students participating in the course. An experimental program was featured in the spring of 1980. Through a cooperative agreement with the School of Pastoral Care of N.C. Baptist Hospital, Wilkes General Hospital, Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and the association, *Basic Clinical Pastoral Education* was offered at Wilkes General Hospital with Kenneth Thornton as the instructor. Seven students were involved, for which we are grateful. However, your committee was sorely disappointed that pastors of Brushy Mountain Association did not support this splendid opportunity. Only one pastor from this association was enrolled; the other six pastors came from adjoining associations.

The School of Christian Studies will offer *Old Testament Survey* as its next project. This is a three-part course. Part I of O.T. 0103 is being offered this fall from Sept. 23 through December 2. The course is being taught on Tuesday evening. Parts 2 and 3 will be offered in the spring and fall of 1981.
