RENA MCNEIL SPICER

Rena McNeil Spicer was born May 14, 1921 to J.C. and Bessie McNeil in the Mount Pleasant Community of Wilkes County. She became a Christian at an early age and joined Mount Pleasant Baptist Church.

She was a graduate of Mount Pleasant High School and Mars Hill Junior College, also attended Appalachian State Teacher's College. She then taught in the Wilkes County School System for twenty years. She retired from Wilkes General Hospital as a ward secretary in 1988. She had two daughters, Sara McCall and Becky Macey, and three grandchildren.

Rena was a charter member of Millers Creek Baptist Church where she remained active until her death May 13, 1989. She was a dedicated member to the total life of the church.

She held many places of leadership in her church as well as in Brushy Mountain Baptist Association. Some of the positions included WMU Director, Church Training Director, G.A. leader, Sunday School teacher, new member orientation class teacher, senior citizens leader and devoted many hours of volunteer work to her church, association, and community.

Those who know Rena knew some of the ways in which she helped others, yet, probably no one was aware of all the many people she helped.

We thank God for the gracious and gentle spirit set forth by Sister Rena and for her unswerving dedication to the advancement of God's Kingdom.



REX WHITTINGTON

Rex William Whittington was born March 5, 1926 and died May 29, 1990. He was the youngest son of John C. and Etta Kilby Whittington. Rex was reared in a Christian home and made his decision for Christ while serving in the U.S. Army at the age of nineteen. He was a member of Pleasant Home Baptist Church in the Millers Creek community. After his time with the army during World War II, he served his church in many different positions: Sunday School Teacher, Sunday School Superintendent, pulpit committee and as a deacon.

Rex married Aline Hayes September 6, 1947 and to this union four children were born: Sandra, Richard, Susan and Janie.

Rex was a Wilkes educator and pioneer in community education. He started North Carolina's first Community School Program. In 1979 he received the Distinguished Service Award from the National Community Education Association and in 1982 the Distinguished Service Award from his alma mater, Appalachian State University.

During twenty-seven years of working with the youth of Wilkes County, Rex set a positive Christian role model for both the youth and his co-workers. He served as teacher, coach, principal, associate superintendent and on the elected Wilkes County School Board as member and chairman. Rex believed in and promoted cooperation between churches and the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association. He served as a messenger from his church and as a member and chairman of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Nominating Committee.

HISTORY OF WELCOME HOME BAPTIST CHURCH

1936 - 1991

It was early in the year of 1936 that the seeds of a new church were planted in the minds and hearts of a small group of people in the Cricket community of Wilkes County. The first meeting to plan for the new church was held in the Union School Building at Cricket. At this meeting, Mr. Carl J. Jones was elected Moderator and Mr. W.H. Hurley was elected Clerk. A second meeting was held on June 30 for the purpose of organizing a Sunday School. The following officers were elected: Superintendent, Mr. Harry Kendall; Secretary, Mrs. G.L. Michael; Adult Teacher, Mr. Will Hurley; Intermediate Teacher, Mr. Sherman Shumate; Junior Teacher, Mr. G.L. Michael; Primary Teacher, Mrs. Ed Brookshire: Beginner Teacher, Mrs. H.E. Parsons. Sunday School was conducted in the school building during the summer and fall of that year, and in various meetings, plans were made for a church building. On September 16, 1936, an evening meeting was held in the Union School Building for the purpose of officially organizing the new church. A choir, led by Mr. Sherman Shumate, sang a song and following the devotional conducted by Rev. J.E. Hayes, Mr. Harry Kendall stated the purpose of the meeting. A presbytery, composed of Rev. J.E. Hayes, Rev. A. B. Hayes and Rev. D.A. Adams, and Deacon W.M. Carson and Deacon George Osborne from the Gordon Baptist Church, proceeded to organize the church. The name given to the church was Welcome Home Baptist Church. This name had been recommended by a committee upon suggestion by Mrs. Monroe Snider, who stated that she wanted a church where everyone could feel welcome.

There were thirty-three persons received that Wednesday evening as the first members of the church.

One of the first orders of business for Welcome Home Baptist Church was the selection of deacons. Mr. Harry Kendall and Mr. Sherman Shumate were elected to serve with Mr. J.E. Brookshire, who had been a deacon in the church from which he came. Since that time there has been five men received from another church as a deacon and thirty-eight men ordained by Welcome Home Baptist Church.

The first building for Welcome Home Baptist Church was begun in October 1936 and in January 1937 the first worship service was held in it. The dedication service was held October 9, 1938. Eleven years later, in 1949, the church added eight Sunday School rooms, a baptistry, new pews, a central heating system and brick veneered the exterior. In October 1960 the church built a new educational building. Following several improvements in the late seventies, the church voted in November 1983 to build a new worship center. The building was completed with additional parking area in March 1985.

During the past few years the church has placed a strong emphasis on missions and evangelism. In the winter of 1989 a group of eleven men, led by Pastor Ken Jones, made an actual mission trip to Jamaica to assist the Baptist churches there that had been devastated by Hurricane Hugo. They were able to replace the roofs on two churches that had been severely damaged. In addition to doing the repair work, evangelism was also carried out resulting in eleven people accepting Jesus Christ. In 1989, the church became active in the Brazilian Partnership. The Pastor has been to Brazil each year since then along with five other members who have been at least once. This past summer twenty members of the church were involved in a summer mission project to Virginia Beach, Virginia. This youth ministry team had a tremendous experience doing Camp Clubs and evening evangelistic services in three area campgrounds resulting in thirty-two first time decisions for Christ. These missions projects have been supported by the church and have been a blessing to the entire body.

In the past two years the pre-school department and the fellowship hall have both been completely renovated. A long range planning committee is in place to make plans for future renovation and needed expansion of our physical plant.

This brief history is from 1978-1991. The Zion Hill Baptist Church is located in the Boomer Community.


Pastor L. J. Culler served the church from January 1978 to April 2, 1989. During Rev. Culler's pastorate the church debt was retired. The church drive and parking lot were paved, a church van purchased, additional lot adjacent to the church was acquired, and a church constitution was adopted.

Pastor James A. Hubbard began serving the church on April 9, 1989 which was the day of the 175th anniversary of the church. A great 175th Anniversary Celebration was observed. During the time from April 9, 1989 until this present time a grading project on the additional lad acquired and a new drive way into the church have been completed. All mission organizations have been started (WMU, Brotherhood, R.A.'s, G.A.'s, Acteens, and Mission Friends). Articles of Incorporation have been completed. An evening worship service was started after over twenty years without an evening worship service. In the past two years and four months the church has broken every record of giving to the State, Home Mission, and Foreign Mission Offerings. There have been sixty-eight additions to the church from April 9, 1989 to August 25, 1991. Thirty-one additions by baptism and thirtyseven by letter.

The Zion Hill Baptist Church is rejoicing in the Lord for His many blessing upon us.

Constitution

PREAMBLE

We, the Baptist Churches of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association, unite according to the plan and for the purpose and work of New Testament churches in our world. To this end and according to the following articles, we cooperate to the fullest extent possible with the State and Southern Baptist Convention and subscribe to the principles of the 1963 *Baptist Faith and Message* statement.

ARTICLE | - NAME

This body shall be known as the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association of North Carolina.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Association to consider and promote measures for increasing the harmony, the knowledge and the spiritual life of the churches and for developing and directing their energies and their contributions in the advancement of Christ's kingdom throughout the earth, always in harmony with the teachings of the New Testament. This Association shall be an auxiliary of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in all their missionary, educational and benevolent work.

To accomplish this purpose, the association shall seek to: (1) enhance the fellowship among member churches; (2) present the Gospel of Jesus Christ to everyone in our area; (3) encourage and facilitate church growth and development and provide other services to the churches; (4) coordinate mission ministries in our area and promote cooperation in state, home and foreign missions; and, (5) provide an additional channel by which member churches may interact with Southern Baptist agencies and institutions.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches desiring to affiliate with it. Any church desiring to become a member of the Association shall present, through messengers chosen for that purpose, its request for membership on APPLICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP form provided in the minutes along with a UNIFORM ASSOCIATIONAL LETTER provided by the clerk, at any annual session of the body. The moderator shall refer the application to the Committee on Membership for study and investigation. The church shall maintain for the year the status of associate membership until the committee makes its recommendation. If favorable, it will be received into full membership with all the rights and privileges at the next annual session. If the Association then votes to receive the church, the moderator shall extend the hand of fellowship to the messengers.

SECTION 2. The Association shall be sole judge of its membership and may receive churches, or reject churches, according to its Constitution and Bylaws. Member churches may withdraw from the Association as they desire. Any church in the Association which fails to cooperate with the Association shall, upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee of the Association, be contacted by the Membership Committee to determine the intentions of the church regarding its remaining in the Association.

A cooperating church shall be defined as one which sends an annual report to the Association and messengers to Associational meetings, and contributes to the financial program of the Association.

SECTION 3. The Association shall withdraw fellowship from any church in its membership which shall be found to be disorderly in faith and practice, but not written charges are brought against it, which charges shall have been authorized by the official act of the church offering the same, or by the Membership Committee of the Association. Thereafter, any such charges shall be carefully considered by the Association at its next annual session.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The Annual Session of the Association shall be held on Monday and Tuesday following the first Sunday in October.

SECTION 2. The Mid-Year Meeting shall be held on Monday following the first Sunday in April.

SECTION 3. The Association may be called into special session, if necessary, by a majority vote of the Executive Committee, provided the churches are given two weeks' notice and announcement of the purpose of the meeting.

SECTION 4. In case of emergency, the Executive Committee shall have the authority to change the time and/or place of meetings, and shall be responsible for providing churches with sufficient notice of change.

SECTION 5. Each church is entitled to be represented by its pastor, other ordained ministers holding membership in the church, and such additional messengers as will permit a total of 10 messengers. Churches with more than 500 members are entitled to an additional messenger for each 100 members more than the initial 500. Messengers shall be elected annually for all Associational meetings. It is suggested that at least five of the messengers be leaders of individual church organizations.

ARTICLE V - AUTHORITY

While independent and sovereign in its own sphere, the Association does not claim, and will never attempt to exercise any authority over any other Baptist Body, whether church or auxiliary organization.

ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTION

SECTION 1. Officers of this Association shall be the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Trustees, Brotherhood Director, Church Training Director, Evangelism Director, Missions Development Director, Music Director, Steward-ship Director, Sunday School Director, Vacation Bible School Director, and Woman's Missionary Union Director.

SECTION 2. The Brotherhood Director, Church Training Director, Evangelism Director, Missions Development Director, Music Director, Stewardship Director, Sunday School Director, Vacation Bible School Director and Woman's Missionary Union Director shall be elected at the April Mid-Year Meeting. All other officers will be elected at the Annual Session. The nominees shall be contacted and nominated by the Nomination Committee. Nominations may also be made from the floor.

SECTION 3. Officers shall serve for a term of one year, unless stated otherwise, and shall assume their duties at the close of the meetings at which they are elected.

SECTION 4. Whenever vacancies occur during the year, the Nominating Committee will present the names of replacements at a regular meeting of the Executive Committee for approval. These will serve until the close of the next Annual Session or until successors are elected.

SECTION 5. Any person having served two terms as Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election for a period of two years.

ARTICLE VII - TRUSTEES AND THEIR ELECTION

There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one of whom should be an attorney. Trustees shall be elected for an indefinite term and shall serve at the pleasure of the Association.

ARTICLE VIII - THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. Membership: The Executive Committee shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the Representative on the General Board of the Baptist State Convention, the ministers who are pastors in the Association, and one lay representative elected by each church, and the chairmen of all standing committees of the Association.

SECTION 2. Duties: The Executive Committee shall have the authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by the Constitution. The Executive Committee shall carry out other requirements as set forth in this Constitution and Bylaws. It shall be the duty of this committee to meet in January and July, and to make reports and recommendations to the Association at its Annual Session. Twenty members shall constitute a quorum to transact business after notice of such meetings has been given to all members. The Officers of this committee shall be the Moderator, the Vice-Moderator and the Clerk of the Association, who shall be the Secretary. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to see that the committee meets at least quarterly and at any other time deemed necessary. All other provisions of this constitution and Bylaws notwithstanding, the Executive Committee shall not be empowered to convey property, incur long-term indebtedness, nor employ or terminate personnel.

ARTICLE IX - MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL

SECTION 1. Membership: The Missions Development Council shall be composed of the Program Directors of the Association and the Director of Missions, who shall serve as chairman.

SECTION 2. Duties: The Missions Development Council shall be convened at least quarterly, by the Chairman, with called meetings as required. The Council shall plan and promote the programs and interests of the Association. The Council shall: (1) Initiate, review and recommend plans for involving officers, organizations, and committees in attaining the goals of the Association; (2) Study the needs of the churches and people of the Association; (3) Serve as a Calendar Committee in accordance with Bylaw IV. The Council should concern itself with the preparation of the Associational Calendar and present it to the Annual Session for consideration. Any committee chairperson may attend the council meeting at any time to present plans and programs involving that committee.

ARTICLE X - COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The Association shall have the following standing committees with terms of office being from the close of the October meeting through the following October meeting:

- A. To be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected at the October meeting:
 - 1. Committee on Personnel (Bylaw III, Section 1)
 - 2. Committee on Youth (Bylaw III, Section 2)
 - 3. Committee on Evangelism (Bylaw III, Section 3)
 - 4. Committee on Finance (Bylaw III, Section 4)
 - 5. Committee on Ordinations (Bylaw III, Section 5)
 - 6. Committee on Memorials (Bylaw III, Section 6)
 - 7. Committee on Nominations (Bylaw III, Section 7)
 - 8. Committee on Constitution (Bylaw III, Section 8)
 - 9. Committee on Membership (Bylaw III, Section 9)
 - 10. Committee on Properties (Bylaw III, Section 14)
 - 11. Committee on Calendar (Bylaw III, Section 15)
 - 12. School of Christian Studies Committee (Bylaw III, Section 16)
 - 13. Committee on Enrollment (Bylaw III, Section 13)
 - 14. Committee on Place and Preacher (Bylaw III, Section 11)
 - 15. Committee on Resolutions (Bylaw III, Section 12)
 - 16. Program Planning Committee (Bylaw III, Section 17)
 - 17. Mission Ministries Committee (Bylaw III, Section 18)

B. Committee on Committees appointed by Moderator at mid- year meeting.

ARTICLE XI - GENERAL PROVISIONS

SECTION 1. The employment of a Director of Missions shall follow the procedure outlined in Bylaw VI, Section 1, with the understanding that said person be extended an indefinite call and that a period of reasonable notice be given by either the missionary or the Association in the event of termination of such employment.

SECTION 2. The Director of Missions shall be empowered to procure and supervise necessary secretarial and janitorial personnel for the proper operation and maintenance of the Associational office, provided that funds for the hiring and salary of such personnel have been included within the current year's budget.

SECTION 3. All questions of order not herein provided for shall be decided according to Robert's Rules of Order, Revised.

SECTION 4. Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any annual session upon vote of two-thirds of the members present, provided that such amendments be presented on the first day of the annual session and voted upon the second day.

SECTION 5. ROTATING OF COMMITTEES. One-third of each committee shall be elected to serve a period of three years. Committees or parts of committees composed of program directors shall not be subject to rotation. No member shall succeed himself for more than one additional term. Vacancies occurring during the year may be filled by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 6. SPECIAL ADVISORS. The Moderator and Director of Missions will serve on all committees of the Association as special advisors.

Bylaws

BYLAW I - GENERAL

SECTION 1. The Association shall convene as provided by the Constitution (Article IV, Section 1, 2, 3, 4).

SECTION 2. Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercise.

SECTION 3. A majority of the members present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of any business except the matter of making changes in the Constitution.

SECTION 4. Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator, shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration and avoid the use of unnecessary personalities.

SECTION 5. The members shall observe toward the officers and towards one another such courtesies as are becoming to Christians.

SECTION 6. The annual Associational year, for the purpose of reporting statistical information, shall be September 1 to August 31, inclusive.

BYLAW II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. Moderator

The Moderator shall preside over meetings of the body according to the constitution and bylaws. He shall be chairman of the Executive Committee and be exofficio member of all other committees. He shall see that the Executive Committee meets in January and July and at any other time deemed necessary. He shall be elected for one year and shall not succeed himself after the second consecutive year.

SECTION 2. Vice-Moderator

The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence, or at the pleasure of the Moderator, and shall be vice chairman of the Executive Committee.

SECTION 3. Clerk

The Clerk shall provide annual report forms at least 30 days before the October meeting, distribute at the October meeting copies of a digest of these reports, make an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distribution of minutes, records, and other documents of the Association, and serve also as secretary of the Executive Committee.

SECTION 4. Treasurer

The Treasurer shall receive and bank all funds of the Association in the name of the Association; disburse the same upon instructions from the Association, its Executive Committee, or as designated in the budget; render an accurate report of receipts and disbursements and distribute same at the October meeting; give an oral report at each regular meeting of the Association or its Executive committee; and keep books available and up-to-date for examination.

The Treasurer shall serve as a member of the Committee on Finance.

The Chairman of the Committee on Finance shall have authority to act for the Treasurer in the event the Treasurer is incapacitated.

SECTION 5. Auditor

The Auditor shall, at the close of the fiscal year, make an audit of the Treasurer's records.

SECTION 6. Historian

The Historian, in his sole discretion, shall collect facts of interest to the Association and the cooperating churches, and shall make a report to each annual session of the Association.

SECTION 7. Program Directors

The Program Directors of the Association shall include the Directors of Sunday School, Church Training, Brotherhood, WMU, Music, Evangelism, School of Christian Studies, and such special missions project coordinators as may be selected in response to ministry projects adopted by the Association. These shall be in charge of their respective organizations during their tenure of service.

BYLAW III - DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. Committee on Personnel

The Committee on Personnel shall be composed of six members, each of whom will serve a tenure of three years, with two members rotating off the Committee each year. The Committee will prepare and update, as necessary, position descriptions of all Associational staff personnel, excluding the Director of Missions whose responsibilities are described by Bylaw VI. It shall survey the need for additional staff positions; recruit, interview, and recommend to the Association or its Executive Committee new employed personnel; and, when necessary, recommend to the Executive Committee the termination of employment of staff personnel. The Committee shall review annually salaries and benefits, and make recommendations to the Finance Committee. It shall review at least annually the performance of each employee, receive any grievance, and otherwise seek to promote harmonious relationships between all employees of the Association.

SECTION 2. Committee on Youth

The Committee on Youth shall be composed of six (6) members, one of which shall be a minister who shall serve as chairman. The committee shall be concerned with ways of relating youth to the churches of the Association and shall lead the churches and association to plan programs and activities that will meet their needs.

SECTION 3. Committee on Evangelism

The Committee on Evangelism, composed of three members, shall promote the work of Evangelism within the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs shall be subject to approval by the Association or its Executive Committee. The Evangelism Committee shall be chaired by the Director of Evangelism.

SECTION 4. Committee on Finance

A. The Committee on Finance, composed of six members and the Treasurer, shall study the Association's financial needs for an adequate program, prepare and present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise and develop plans for securing the cooperation of churches in providing funds to meet the budget, and make a written report at the October meeting.

B. In the event it becomes necessary to borrow funds for current operating expenses of the Association, the Committee on Finance is authorized to instruct the Trustees to secure by loan an amount not to exceed 10 percent of the annual budget for a period not to exceed 90 days, and to renew the loan as needed. SECTION 5. Committee on Ordinations

The Committee on Ordinations, composed of seven ministers, shall when

requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of candidates for the Gospel Ministry. Churches wishing to ordain ministers are requested to place their candidates before the Committee at least 30 days prior to the date set for examination on the following principles:

- a. Christian experience or conversion
- b. Call to the ministry
- c. Attitude toward denominational work and objects
- d. Support of denominational causes
- e. Moral and spiritual fitness
- f. Doctrinal beliefs
- g. Biblical knowledge

Candidates are to be ordained with the assistance of this Committee only when they are serving a church or churches as pastor or having been called as pastor of a Baptist church of like faith and practice with those member churches of this Association.

No candidate for ordination shall be considered by the committee who has not been a member of a cooperating church for at least one year. The Committee shall consider only male members for ordination.

Candidates are to be urged to prepare themselves for the ministry as far as possible in Baptist institutions of higher learning.

This Committee shall not recommend any candidate for ordination whom they feel will not bring honor and esteem to the Lord, to Southern Baptist and to the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association.

Recommendations will be made by the Committee to the church where the candidate holds membership. The Committee will assist the church in the ordination service at a time convenient to the church and to the members of the Committee if such assistance is desired.

SECTION 6. Committee on Memorials

The Committee on Memorials, composed of three members, shall bring a report at the October meeting and lead in a memorial service in memory of those reported by the churches as deceased since the last annual meeting.

SECTION 7. Committee on Nominations

The Committee on Nominations, composed of seven members, shall contact and nominate at the April or October meeting of the Association, the officers and representatives of the Association according to Article VI of the Constitution.

SECTION 8. Committee on Constitution

The Committee on Constitution, composed of five members, shall be available to study any changes or revisions in the Constitution, and to make recommendations as needed to keep the Constitution in line with the policies and programs of the Association.

SECTION 9. Committee on Membership

The Committee on Membership, composed of five (5) members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution, Article III.

SECTION 10. Committee on Committees

The Committee on Committees, composed of seven (7) members, shall be appointed by the Moderator at the mid-year meeting, and shall nominate persons to be elected by the Association to serve on all standing committees.

SECTION 11. Committee on Place and Preachers

The Committee on Place and Preachers, composed of three (3) members, shall

receive or solicit invitations for the place or places for meetings of the Association, and shall recommend the places. It shall also recommend the preachers and alternates for the annual sermons.

SECTION 12. Committee on Resolutions

The Committee on Resolutions, composed of three (3) members, shall draw up and present to the Association at the October meeting resolutions of appreciation and any other resolution it may deem expedient.

SECTION 13. Committee on Enrollment

The Committee on Enrollment, composed of five (5) members, shall prepare for and direct the enrollment of messengers at all sessions of Associational meetings. Each messenger shall be enrolled only once during the October meeting. This Committee shall be prepared to report on enrollment when called for during meetings.

SECTION 14. Properties Committee

The Properties Committee, composed of three (3) members, shall be responsible for the maintenance of all properties owned or leased by the Association or its Trustees.

SECTION 15. The Calendar Committee

The Calendar Committee shall be composed of the following Associational officers: Director of Missions, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, WMU Director, Brotherhood Director, Director of Music Ministry, and President of the Ministers' Conference. This Committee shall prepare an Associational calendar for the year, and present same to the annual meeting for adoption. This calendar shall be included in the annual.

SECTION 16. School of Christian Studies Committee

The School of Christian Studies Committee shall work with the Director of the School of Christian Studies to plan, promote, and implement the offering of such courses of study as will meet the needs of pastors and laypersons in the areas of biblical studies, historical theology, Baptist life, church administration, Christian education, and pastoral training.

SECTION 17. Program Planning Committee

The Program Planning Committee shall be composed of five (5) members. It shall be their responsibility to prepare the agenda and arrange for speakers (other than the two primary messages of the Annual Meeting which are the responsibility of the Place and Preacher Committee) for all plenary meetings of the association.

SECTION 18. Mission Ministries Committee

The Mission Ministries Committee shall be composed of five (5) persons who shall be chosen so as to be representative of each geographical division of the associational area. It shall be the responsibility of this committee to discover, evaluate, and recommend mission and/or ministry needs for the consideration of the Associational Missions Development Council and thence to the Association in session. This committee shall be represented by its chairperson on the Missions Development Council.

BYLAW IV - REPRESENTATIVES

SECTION 1. The Nominating Committee in its report to the Annual Meeting shall nominate the following representatives: Children's Homes, Christian Education, Foreign Missions, Retirement Homes, Home Missions, Hospital, Annuity Board, Religious Literature, State Missions.

SECTION 2. These representatives shall familiarize themselves with the work of the institution or agency which they represent. They shall promote the work and encourage churches to support it. They shall secure or write a report on their institution or agency. If called upon by the Program Committee they shall make a report at the Annual Session. In any case they shall prepare their report to be included in the Minutes of the Association.

BYLAW V - TRUSTEES

The legal title to all real and personal property of the Association shall be vested in the trustees and their successors in such office. The said trustees may convey said property by legal instruments pursuant to resolutions adopted and approved by the Association. They shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the said Association. See Article VII of the Constitution.

BYLAW VI - DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

SECTION 1. The Director of Missions shall be elected by the Association upon the recommendation of a special Director of Missions Search Committee. The Director of Missions Search Committee shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association or by the Executive Committee. The Director of Missions Search Committee shall be composed of seven (7) members who shall be representative of the churches in the Association both numerically and geographically. Upon his election, the Director of Missions shall become a member of all committees and organizations of the Association. The relationship between the Association and its Director of Missions may be terminated following a reasonable notice given by either party.

SECTION 2. The Director of Missions shall promote the work and witness of the Association and denomination, cooperating with the churches, their pastors and officers and Associational committees and organizations.

A. He shall be responsible for planning, promoting, and executing the ministry of the Association in cooperation with the Executive Committee and the Missions Development Council.

B. He shall make an annual report to the Association at the October meeting.

C. He shall be an ex officio member of all committees of the Association, serving in an advisory and/or resource capacity.

D. He shall seek to visit each church in the Association in order to

- (1) Enrich Christian fellowship among the churches.
- (2) Encourage and strengthen the ministry of the churches.
- (3) Enhance the cooperative relationship between the churches and the Association.

E. He shall, when necessary, conduct surveys or inquiries in order to determine specific needs for ministry within the area of the Association.

F. He shall, upon request, provide a list of qualified persons who may be considered by churches seeking pastors.

G. He shall have full administrative responsibility for all personnel employed by the Association.

SECTION 3.

A. The Director of Missions is entitled to two weeks vacation annually. Upon completion of five years service, the Director of Missions shall be entitled to three weeks annual vacation. Vacation is to be taken within the calendar year, and it is not accumulative. B. The Director of Missions is entitled to 30 days sick leave per calendar year, sick leave is not to be taken as vacation, and it is not accumulative.

C. The Director of Missions is entitled to four weeks per calendar year which he may use at his discretion for personal enrichment, professional development, and speaking engagements or revivals outside the Association. This time is not accumulative.


SECTION 4. Should there occur at any time a grievance on the part of the Association or the Director of Missions, either party may consult with the Moderator and Chairman of the Personnel Committees.

BYLAW VII - ANNUAL REPORTS

Persons who are to bring reports to the October meeting of the Association shall present the same to the Director of Missions or Clerk two weeks prior to the October meeting for these to be included in the Book of Reports.

BYLAW VII - AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the Bylaws may be made at any session of the October meeting of the Association when presented in writing and approved by a majority of the messengers present and voting.



Proceedings

of the

One Hundred Twentieth Annual Meeting

1. The 120th annual session of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association was called to order at 4:00 p.m. at Welcome Home Baptist Church by Moderator James Gore.

2. The congregation joined in singing "Take My Life, Lead Me Lord" led by Rev. Sam Childs accompanied by Mrs. Martha Childs at the piano, both from Liberty Grove Baptist Church.

3. Devotion (scripture - John 4) and prayer was given by Rev. Ted Miller of Moravian Falls Baptist Church.

4. Pastor Ken Jones welcomed the 239 messengers and visitors representing 37 churches.

5. Ken Jones moved the adoption of the Order of Business with any changes that may be needed. Seconded, adopted.

6. Ken Jones introduced the mission team from Welcome Home Baptist Church who went to Virginia Beach, VA. Crystal Bumgarner spoke of doing Backyard Bible Clubs for children of all races and languages. They also conducted night services consisting of singing and puppets. Misty Miller told that they had only two children the first day, nineteen the second day and thirty children were saved.

7. Moderator Gore announced that a letter from Carlos and Betty Pardue was given out along with the Book of Reports. He asked that we pause for a moment for prayer for Carlos and Betty and also for Martha Colwell. He led in prayer.

BUSINESS SESSION:

- A. Ken Jones gave the Evangelism Report (page 22 of the Book of Reports). He urged everyone to read it. He told of the booth that the Evangelism Committee had at the Apple Festival - several people were saved. A similar booth will be at the Wilkes Agricultural Fair October 15-20 - volunteers are still needed. The Evangelism Conference will be held on October 28-29 at 7:00 p.m. at Millers Creek Baptist Church. Monday night speakers will be Charles M. Lowrie, New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and Henry T. Blackaby, Home Mission Board. Speakers Tuesday night will be Mack Roberts, Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute and Henry T. Blackaby. A soul-winning workshop will be held on Tuesday morning at 9:00 a.m. at Millers Creek Baptist Church.
- B. Rev. Bob Seatz moved the adoption of the Finance Committee Report (page 12). Seconded, adopted.
- C. Bob Seatz gave the Membership Committee Report making a motion that Northside Baptist Church be accepted for full fellowship. Seconded, adopted. Moderator Gore asked the messengers to come up to the front and receive the right hand of fellowship.
- D. Rev. Sam Childs gave the Ordination Committee Report (page 28) stating that they had been called on one time to ordain Dennis Love, Fishing Creek Baptist Church, who was called as pastor to Pilgrim Baptist Church.
- E. In Joe Huffman's absence, Moderator Gore called attention to the Place and Preacher Committee Report on page 23.

- F. Clyde Bumgarner read the Properties Committee Report on page 28 of the Book of Reports.
- G. Bill McKinney moved the adoption of the Calendar as printed with any changes that may be necessary. Seconded, adopted.
- H. Bill read his letter of resignation (retirement) as follows:

Dear Christian friends:

This letter constitutes the formal announcement to this Association of my intention to enter upon retirement effective December 31, 1991 and is my letter of resignation from the position of Director of Missions. My plans are already known to many of you. In July when my wife and I had prayed through to a decision in this matter, I began discussions with Moderator Jim Gore in order that he might set in motion the process defined in the By-laws for securing my successor in office.

On July 19, 1976 this Association graciously extended me a call to serve as your Director of Missions beginning on September 1, 1976. The fifteen years which I have served our Lord among you in that capacity have been fruitful and pleasant years of ministry. I thank you for the privilege of serving God among the churches of this Association. You have allowed me to move among you and to lead you in many avenues of growth and service, and you have given me freedom to fulfil my need for personal involvement in counseling and serving ministries. Although we have made significant progress in several areas of associational life. We have not accomplished everything that our Lord had in mind for this portion of His vineyard. I have sought to bring forward the work in God's strength to the best of my abilities and I freely accept due responsibility for being unable to lead our Association to do more for the glory of God and for the advancement of His Kingdom. I earnestly pray that my successor may be able to lead you in the accomplishment of every objective which God has in mind.

I especially cherish the warm relationships which have developed over the years with churches, pastors, associational leaders and other lay persons. It is my desire to continue to enjoy those relationships and to remain open to opportunities to minister in the name of the Lord as He directs. May God bless each one of you.

- The Dedication of Annuals Report was given by Rev. James Weaver (page 15). The 1991 annual is being dedicated to Rena McNeil Spicer and Rex Whittington.
- J. In the absence of Lillian Foster, Moderator Gore called attention to the histories of Welcome Home Baptist Church and Zion Hill Baptist Church (pages 10 and 11).
- K. Rev. Edgar Whitlock gave the School of Christian Studies Report (page 24) and hopes that everyone will read the report. He stated that Seminary Extension has helped churches for forty years. Only two seminaries do not recognize seminary extension courses at this time. At this time we have a course being taught in the prison and two churches are interested in having studies in their churches. The church can underwrite the cost for its members.
- L. Al Andrews moved the adoption of the Nominating Committee's recommendations of the members to serve on the Director of Missions Search Committee as follows: Rev. Edgar Whitlock (C), New Hope Baptist Church; Rev.

Rick Speas, Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church; Mrs. Elizabeth Billings, Zion Hill Baptist Church; Ms. Aline Whittington, Pleasant Home Baptist Church; Mr. Rudy Roberts, Wilkesboro Baptist Church; Mr. Russ Feree, First Baptist, North Wilkesboro; Mr. Harold Cooper, Millers Creek Baptist Church; and alternate, Mr. Bill Michael, Hinshaw Street Baptist Church. Seconded, adopted.

- M. The congregation joined in singing "I Love To Tell The Story" led by Mrs. Leslie Speas of Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church accompanied by Sam Childs, Liberty Grove Baptist Church, at the piano.
- N. Al Andrews moved the adoption of the Nominating Committee Report found on page 6. Seconded, adopted.
- O. Al Andrews moved the adoption of the Committee of Committees Report on page 7. Al read the names of all the new members. Seconded, adopted.
- P. The Treasurer's Report was given by Mrs. Teresa H. Taylor.
- Q. Mr. Pete Lovette gave the General Board Report (page 20). The Board met in January, May and September. He is a member of the Business Management Committee. The next meeting will be in January, 1992. There are ten committees that handle various businesses. Cooperative Program receipts down a quarter of a percent. As of September 20, 1991, \$19,320,000 had been given by all of the churches. \$6,098,000 given to Foreign Missions and \$3,812,000 given to Home Missions. The 1991 offering to World Hunger totaled \$338,923 - a 13.6% increase.
- R. Miscellaneous business Rev. Horace Moree noted that the General Board Representative is chosen by the General Board - is there any way the association can elect their own? Bill McKinney explained that the Bylaws of the Baptist State Convention state that the General Board selects a member - alternating between a lay person and clergy and sizes of churches. A constitutional change would have to be made in the Baptist State Convention constitution to allow associations to choose their own representative.
- S. The Sunday School Report was given by Robert Duncan who stated that the ASSIST team went to Ridgecrest to learn about conducting workshops. They will be glad to come into the individual churches and conduct workshops. We had two Vacation Bible School clinics this year. Moderator Gore presented Robert with an ASSIST Team certificate and asked him to present the other certificates to his team.
- T. Mae Duncan gave the WMU Report and asked that everyone read the report printed on page 18. Sunday, October 13, is World Hunger Day and there will be a Wilkes Cares truck at Oakwoods Baptist Church from 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Baptist Womens World Day of Prayer is November 4, 1991. She asked that we remember the Week of Prayer for Foreign Missions. Mrs. Rose Beshears will be teaching the Foreign Mission Study at Moravian Falls Baptist Church on November 19, 1991. The WMU theme for this year has been "Called and Accountable" - each of us are called by God to do something and are accountable to God to do it. "Operation Santa Claus" is a ministry to the patients at Broughton Hospital that the WMU has voted to participate in. Wilkes County has ninety-four patients at Broughton. Mae left some pamphlets at the front for messengers to pick up and take back to their church. Mae presented Bill McKinney with the WMU "Pastor of the Year" award. Bill stated that no honor could possibly mean more to him.

- U. Doug Rollins gave the Brotherhood Report as printed on page 27. The RA Jamboree that was held on September 13-14 was a huge success with 66 R.A.'s and 40-45 leaders attending. Doug thanked R.G. Absher and Mike Kerhoulas for setting up the Jamboree. The Brotherhood conducted the race fan ministry at the North Wilkesboro Speedway at the spring and fall races. At the September race they had 80-100 race fans at the Saturday night service and 200 at the Sunday morning service. Doug thanked the Baptist men of Wilkesboro Baptist Church for their help in setting up for the services. He also thanked the R.A.'s of Wilkesboro Baptist Church for handing out brochures to the race fans. He encouraged more churches to get involved in this ministry - fans look forward to the worship times. We are in partnership with New York and are now trying to get new under garments for people at the Graffiti House - several hundred pairs of socks were donated by a manufacturer. Sao Paulo is in need of a parcel of land to build a church on - the Brotherhood of the association have led in this project to collect \$5.000.00.
- V. The Music Report, page 24, was read by Martha Childs. She announced that the Associational Choir would be singing for tonight's meeting. On February 10, 1992 the Singing Churchmen/women will be singing at First Baptist, North Wilkesboro. The associational zone directors are: Kay Steelman, Gayln Page, Gregg Wright, Anna Marie Benge, Charles Billings and Martha Childs.
- W. Moderator Gore moved the adoption of all of the reports as presented. Seconded, adopted. He recognized our visitors, Tom Lolley, Baptist State Convention; Mabel Couch, Church Growth Multiplyer, BSC; and Margie Laney, Director of Missions, Stone Mountain.
- X. Moderator Gore stated that Leslie Speas would be coming to bring special music, then Robert Duncan would bring the message and the benediction and blessing of the meal. Ken Jones would give the instructions for the evening meal.

END OF BUSINESS SESSION

8. Leslie Speas, Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church, brought the special music and sang "Each One Reach One."

9. Rev. Robert Duncan, pastor of Oakwoods Baptist Church, came to bring the afternoon message. He read scripture from Matthew 9:36 and had prayer. His sermon title was ''Truth, Tragedy, Triumph.'' Truth - people need the Lord, salvation, forgiveness, they need Jesus. Laborers are few - let us get moved to win people to the Lord. Tragedy - we are too busy. So many things to do there is no time to spend winning the lost. Laborers are few - go with the Holy Spirit and win people to Christ. Teach each new convert to ''reach one, one by one''. Triumph - laborers unto the harvest, people are everywhere. The triumph comes when we share the gospel and people are won to Christ. The Lord will add to the church daily - triumph of seeing another soul saved. Are you to busy to be moved for a lost soul? Let's tell the story of Jesus. Are you still telling the story? Keep telling the story and your fire will not go out. Rev. Duncan asked everyone to stand with eyes closed - asked everyone to ask silently for God's help to save souls. Then he had prayer of benediction and blessing of the meal.

10. Ken Jones gave the instructions for the meal and the meeting was recessed for the evening meal.

11. The meeting was reconvened at 7:00 p.m. with Moderator James Gore presiding who gave Rick Speas, Vice-Moderator, the responsibility of presiding over the evening session.

12. The congregation joined in singing "Take My Life, Lead Me Lord" led by Martha Childs, Liberty Grove Baptist Church, accompanied by Mary Ruth Sebastian, Baptist Home Baptist Church, at the piano and Gregg Wright, First Baptist, North Wilkesboro, at the organ.

13. Rev. Dennis Love, Pilgrim Baptist Church, read scripture from John 15:12 and led in prayer.

14. Ken Jones welcomed the 239 messengers representing 37 churches.

15. Vice-Moderator Speas introduced Kim Brown, Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church, to tell about her experience on a mission trip to Washington, DC. Sixteen church members went and they started in Alexandria, VA. They worked with 20-25 black children - nine children were saved.

16. Vice-Moderator Speas introduced the new pastors and wives in the association: Rev. Gary Morrison and Sylvia (Cub Creek), Rev. Howard Laney, Margie (interim-Boiling Springs), Rev. James Horton, Gloria (Hinshaw Street), Rev. Ted Miller, Varessa (Moravian Falls), Rev. Gary Harrold, Nancy (Mt. Zion), Rev. Dennis Love, Vickie (Pilgrim) and Raytee Greene, Lutrelle (Lewis Fork Mission).

17. Jim Gore gave the Brazil Partnership Report. It has been an outstanding four years - a great success in many ways. A lot of people have been saved. The mission teams have done evangelism, preaching, some training in some areas. A lot was purchased several years ago - it now has a church on it. The association is now in the process of raising \$5,000.00 to purchase another lot to build a church on. There have been three teams to go to Brazil, approximately 30 people. It costs approximately \$45,000.00 for these teams to go with approximately 1,500 persons being saved - every \$32.00 spent a person has been saved. There are 13,500 church members in our association. Receipts for the year were 3 1/2 million, deduct mission causes of 3.1 million - 357 baptisms in our association. It cost \$8,800.00 for every person we led to the Lord in our association. There is only one year left in the Brazil Partnership. In the Spring, 1992 there will be an opportunity to visit two cities that have not been visited previously. We need to enlist five or six additional people for a total of sixteen to seventeen people to go in 1992. This will be the last opportunity for you to go.

18. Ken Jones introduced Dr. Sandy Simmons, missionary to Campinas, Brazil to speak. She is a native of Texas. There are many churches in Brazil due to the North Carolina/Brazil Partnership. She read scripture from 1 Thessalonians 5 and led in prayer. She told of how she was called to be a missionary, her schooling and eventual assignment to Brazil. She urged us to pledge ourselves anew to pray for the missionaries.

19. A special offering was taken for the Brazil Lot Fund while Leslie Speas, Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church, sang "People Need The Lord."

20. The congregation joined in singing "Send The Light" led by Martha Childs accompanied by Mary Ruth Sebastian at the piano and Gregg Wright at the organ.

21. Bill Morrow, Baptist Children's Homes, was introduced. He stated that children need the Lord also. In the next 30 minutes: 285 children will have a broken home, 685 teenagers will become involved with drugs, 57 children will become runaways. The Children's Homes work with the child and the parents - try to rehabilitate the home. Two services that they offer are: Emergency care - 60 days

of service - legal custodian allows child to stay at the home; Cameron Boys Camp - camp for troubled boys ages 11-15 - there now 30 boys in the program - will expand to 40 boys in November. Children in the Children's Homes must go to school and to church. The Thanksgiving Offering goal for this year is \$500,000.00.

22. Calvin Knight, Baptist Hospital, was introduced to give a report. He stated that the Mother's Day Offering for the hospital this year was \$337,314.00. There is a new video on the ministry of the hospital, "The Prescription of Touch," available through Mr. Knight or through the Baptist State Convention.

23. Bobby Stafford, Baptist State Convention, spoke on the opportunities that we have to minister to people in North Carolina. Ten million people come to the Smokey Mountains every year. There are seventy-seven different language works in North Carolina speaking seventeen different languages. Fifty-two percent of our state is unreached - not affiliated with any religious body. In 1991 fifty-two new churches were started in North Carolina. Volunteers are making things happen. People are searching for individuality, meaning in their lives and hope. The Baptist State Convention offers opportunities to reach people in our state.

24. Bob Henry, Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, spoke on retirement for pastors *and* staff. The Annuity Board wants to help churches make the most of their money. How the church pays their pastor and staff is as important as how much the church pays them.

25. Mike McKee, Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute, gave a brief report. Fruitland has an open door policy - anyone that has been called to the ministry may attend.

26. The Associational Choir sang "Oh, Worship The King," "Heavenly Sunlight," "Touched By The Hand of the Lord" and "Standing In His Presence" led by Martha Childs accompanied by Mary Ruth Sebastian at the piano and Gregg Wright at the organ.

27. Moderator Gore postponed his message until the next night because of the late time. He announced that we received \$789.31 for the Brazil Lot Fund.

28. Rev. Jerry Fuller gave the benediction and the meeting adjourned at 9:25 p.m.

SECOND DAY

29. The second day of the 120th Annual Meeting was called to order by Moderator James Gore at 7:00 p.m. on October 8, 1991 at Zion Hill Baptist Church.

30. The congregation joined in singing "Take My Life, Lead Me Lord," led by Martha Childs accompanied by Sam Childs, both of Liberty Grove Baptist Church, at the piano and Steve Anglin, Zion Hill Baptist Church, at the organ.

31. Rev. James Horton, Hinshaw Street Baptist Church, read scripture from Revelations 2 and led in prayer.

32. John German, Zion Hill Baptist Church, welcomed the 147 messengers and visitors representing 35 churches.

33. Moderator Gore stated that as of meeting time we have \$4,170.00 in the Brazil Lot Fund and extended thanks on behalf of the Brazilians. He expressed thanks to Doug Rollins for heading up this project.

34. Moderator Gore introduced the Wilkesboro Baptist Church mission team who went to Lancaster, New York. Jeremy Lowder stated that this was his second mission trip. Each morning they conducted three hours of Backyard Bible Clubs.

The most difficult thing for him to do was the door to door canvassing. While canvassing, Jeremy and Roy Dobyns, Youth Director at Wilkesboro Baptist Church, met a nine year old Catholic boy. He had a lot of questions - Roy gave him a Bible and the last thing the boy said was, "He wanted to be a Christian and a baseball player." Robin Joines used clown ministry to relate to the children. While wearing her clown makeup, she sang "Love In Any Language" for the annual meeting congregation.

35. Lyn Moore, Hinshaw Street Baptist Church, stated that he and others went on a mission trip to Nada, Kentucky. Nada has one store and the people are very poor. They went to work on the small mission and talk to the people (especially the children) about God. The children used the Bibles that the mission team gave them to put on a play about David and Goliath.

36. Moderator Gore gave the Moderator's Report. He stated that he has been a little astounded at how things have worked out in the two day meetings - it has been obvious that God has been with us. The two basic functions of the church are to win the lost and disciple the saved. Moderator Gore spoke on winning the lost to Christ - Jesus originally sent disciples out two by two. He stated that there are 13,500 church members in our association, we had 357 baptisms, there are 73 licensed ministers listed in our annual for our association. If the converts were won by the pastors, that would be five people each. Numbers are a bit shocking and disappointing - he personally does not think that God is well pleased with the churches and people of our association. We can continue not getting out and telling others of Jesus or when we leave the church building, we can find someone to tell about Jesus. The Bible tells us to go out of our houses into other's houses and witness. Moderator asked the group to make a commitment to witness to the lost - "To make a personal commitment to share your testimony to some lost person and/or share the plan of salvation with a lost person between now and Sunday morning." He stated that God would send a lost person across our path if we made this commitment. He asked those who would make the commitment to stand and he led in prayer.

37. The Pastors' Choir sang "Glory to His Name" and "Jesus Paid It All" led by Martha Childs accompanied by Steve Anglin at the piano.

38. Sam and Martha Childs sang "I've Just Seen Jesus."

39. The evening message was brought by Rev. Rick Speas. He read Luke 5:1-11. He stated that the last two days have stressed an unmet need - the need of people to meet the Lord. In order for us to bring people to the lord, we are going to have to make a deep commitment. The title of his sermon was "Launch Out." He stated that we are content to remain in the shallow water -"shallow water Baptists" - shallow in our commitment to the Lord. We should launch out into the deep water where we will have to depend on Jesus. Are we (1) willing to run the risk, (2) willing to launch out with a faith without fear, and (3) willing to have our lives changed? What is the depth of your commitment tonight?

40. Moderator Gore led in prayer.

41. The congregation joined in singing "Share His Love" led by Sam Childs accompanied by Martha Childs at the piano and Steve Anglin at the organ.

BUSINESS SESSION

A. No miscellaneous business.

B. Director of Missions, Bill McKinney, gave his report. He stated that he

rejoices at all we have been challenged with these two days. He asked prayer for Edgar Whitlock who his having some medical problems. He read Luke 6:20-23, 27-36, 43-45, and Luke 14:25-27, 33. We are in a discipleship crisis in America. Christ's command is to make disciples. Our spirituality seems to be a mile wide and an inch deep. Ninety-six percent of Americans believe in God, eighty-six and one-half percent identify with some Christian denomination, sixty percent believe in hell for unbelievers, only one-half of 86 1/2 percent has any ongoing participation in an church. He read from Jeremiah 48:10 and Hosea 5:19, 6:1-3, 6. It is his conviction that God says to Americans today ''What am I going to do with you?'' He stated that he has been among you and loved you for fifteen years. May God bless each one of you and may you be given to His service.

- C. Moderator Gore said this would be a great time to express our love for Bill after the meeting adjourns tonight.
- D. Rev. Hubert Bullis, Shady Grove Baptist Church, gave the Resolutions Committee Report as follows:

Whereas, Welcome Home Baptist Church and Zion Hill Baptist Church so graciously and bountifully shared their facilities and food with those gathered for the 120th Brushy Mountain Baptist Associational Annual Meeting, be it resolved that the association express our grateful appreciation to the families of these two churches.

E. Rev. Hadley Triplett, Purlear Baptist Church, gave the Memorials Committee Report. There was a total of 95 deaths.

END OF BUSINESS SESSION

42. Rev. Triplett led in a benediction prayer for the deceased and their loved ones and the meeting adjourned at 9:10 p.m.



The following make up our Associational Assist Team: Jeanette McNeil (Preschool), Becky Duncan and Brenda Hayes (Children), Judy Anderson (Youth), Carlton Waddell (Adults), Carl McCann (Outreach) and Robert Duncan (Assist Director).

In April the Assist Team led an Associational Sunday School workshop at Cub Creek Baptist Church. This workshop was very well attended. The Assist Team shared about the new Sunday School material coming in the fall. They also taught outreach and inreach through the Sunday School. There were classes for workers in preschool, children, youth and adults. Also, there were classes for Outreach Leaders, Sunday School Directors and Pastors. Many expressed how much they enjoyed the workshop.

In May the Assist Team led in two Associational VBS clinics. One clinic was held at Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church and the other at Oakwoods Baptist Church. Ten different churches were represented at these clinics.

In July at Wilkesboro Baptist Church the State Sunday School workers led in a Sunday School workshop. The workshop was strictly about the new Sunday School material. The workshop was very well attended.

We thank the Lord for a great year in Sunday School. We are already looking forward to next year. The Assist Team is planning to go for more Assist Team training. We hope this year the Assist Team can go into individual churches to help in their Sunday Schools.

SCHOOL OF CHRISTIAN STUDIES REPORT

For forty years the Seminary Extension has helped train ministers who, for one reason or another, have little or no theological training. Distance and cost have been practically eliminated for one sincerely desiring more training. Recently Seminary Extension has reached an agreement with Edison State, a regionally accredited non-traditional college in New Jersey, to accept these Extension Courses as a major component in a Bachelor of Arts in Religion. Likewise, four of our six seminaries award diplomas upon completion of a prescribed number of semester hours in the Diploma Program.

With more than 300 Extension Centers, normally established and conducted by a Baptist Association, both lay leaders and ministers can receive training. Classes meet at least eighteen hours for one semester hour, or twenty-seven for two semester hours credit. The courses of study are of two categories: The Basic Certificate Program and the Diploma Program. The Diploma Program has the academically recognized courses which are taught by teachers with higher certification.

Cost of these courses are currently \$22.00 plus \$7.00 for postage and handling plus the cost of the textbook.

This year locally we have taught two basic courses and are preparing to begin a third. The courses are: "Teaching the Bible to Adults" taught by Edgar Whitlock, "How Southern Baptist Work Together" taught by Rick Felts, and "Overview of the New Testament" course in progress at the Wilkes County Correctional Facility taught by Chaplain Ken Hix.

Present needs include (1) removal of large shrubbery around the office building and planting of shrubs of more appropriate size, and (2) repainting the interior of the office building. These needs will be addressed next year to the extent of budgeted funds.

GENERAL BOARD REPORT

In January 1990, I began a four year term as a General Board member of the N.C. Baptist Convention and have attended two meetings of the board this year, one in January and again in May. My responsibilities include serving as a member of the Business Management Committee which is chaired by Mr. Glendel Stephenson. The next General Board meeting is scheduled for September of this year. There are ten committees that handle various areas of responsibility of the General Board. The General Board conducts the business of the statewide convention in all matters except those specifically exempted by the Constitution. One of the responsibilities of the convention is to serve as a conduit for receiving cooperative program missions gifts from the many churches in our convention and channeling it to the various mission programs.

In North Carolina, overall giving (as shown in the table below) to the cooperative program is lagging behind this year versus 1990. Part of the reason for this may be the turmoil between factions within our Southern Baptist Convention. There are also changes continuing to evolve in the relationship between the N.C. Baptist Convention and the colleges which we support in this state. As a result, at our May meeting a special committee of the N.C. Baptist Convention was appointed to study the convention's relationship with all of our N.C. Baptist agencies, including its six Baptist colleges. This committee is to study and make a final report to the convention annual meeting in November 1992. Several Baptist colleges across the country and in the Carolinas have acted recently to distance themselves from their Baptist Conventions. Most recently Mars Hill College and Meredith College have initiated efforts to become more independent of the N.C. Baptist Convention.

As follows is a brief summary of selected items from the financial statements of the Baptist State Convention that shows the trend of giving by our North Carolina churches through June 30, 1991:

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

The Home Mission Board reported a record number of mission personnel serving in 1990—4,573. This includes 1,290 Mission Service Corps volunteers serving in more than 900 places.

Approximately 150 Southern Baptist chaplains went to serve with United States forces in Saudi Arabia.

The Annie Armstrong Offering, 100 percent of which goes to field missionary work, increased 8.14 percent over 1989 and provided \$35,679,669 for evangelism, church growth, church starting, and ministry work.

The missions personnel force helped start 490 churches, 1,250 missions, and, along with the chaplains and Atlanta staff, recorded 75,590 professions of faith and 4,932 decisions for special service.

Southern Baptists are increasing their emphasis on evangelism and are progressing steadily toward the goal of 500,000 per year by the end of the century. In 1990 Southern Baptists baptized 378,000, an increase of 7.7 percent over 1989. Part of this increase can be attributed to the Here's Hope Revivals coordinated by the Home Mission Board. During the six weeks emphasis, 77,700 new believers were baptized and 104,100 professions of faith were recorded by 22,487 participating churches.

Let us pray daily for Larry Lewis, President of the Home Mission Board; the staff of the Board; our Home Missionaries and volunteers in Home Mission work. Johnny Jackson, Chairman of the Board of Directors, and Larry lewis, President of the Home Missions Board express thanks to Southern Baptists who continue to give their prayer and financial support for Home Missions.

Welcome Home Baptist Church sponsored a mission trip to Virginia Beach. The Home Mission Board, Southern Baptist Convention assisted in arrangements for this mission trip. While at Nada Mission construction work was done on the trailer that houses this mission. The trailer was underpinned, the roof repaired, entrance steps were built, the plumbing on the inside replaced, shelves built. Individuals also took clothing and distributed to those in need. One member of this group, a Gideon, took personal workers testaments to distribute and gave to children. He states, at first the children were hesitant to take testaments, however, after they received them they carried the testaments with them each day when they arrived at the mission. This group was in charge of Sunday service.

On Wednesday this group had a hotdog supper for all that would attend, the youth in particular had a wonderful time. Hinshaw Street Baptist Church sponsored this mission trip, however, no monies were taken from the church budget. All funds were raised by a car wash held by the youth and other fund raisers by WMU and men of the church, truly a unified effort from the church. Approximately \$650.00 was used for building materials, the group of four paid for their own food and lodging. The people who were privileged to be a part of this mission effort have already testified that they received much more than they gave. TO GOD BE THE GLORY!

Wilkesboro Baptist Church sponsored a mission trip to Lancaster, New York. This summer Roy A Dobyns, Jr. led a group of twenty-five (18 youth, 7 adults) to Lancaster, New York for a week. The following is a summary of activities during this mission trip: daily Backyard Bible School each morning, door to door canvas, and a concert was held at the local park. The group stayed at Houghton College dormitory near Buffalo, New York. The youth held services at three local churches, New Covenant Baptist, Calvary Baptist, and Tonewanda Baptist and conducted one-on-one witness. TO GOD BE THE GLORY!

Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church sponsored a mission trip to the Washington, DC area. On July 6, 1991 a group of seventeen men and women led by Pastor Ricky Speas journeyed to Alexandria, Virginia to Downtown Baptist Church, a co-sponsor for this mission trip. The following is a summary of activities: classes held each morning at a local recreation center; the first four units from the Big A series was taught to youth ages ranging from six years old to thirteen years old; craft classes were also held each day; door to door visits were made each evening to the homes of the children and youth attending classes at the recreation center; and one-on-one witnessing.

The group stayed at a local hotel. The Downtown Baptist Church provided a kitchen for the group to prepare their meals. Pastor Ricky Speas states that the testimonies of the people making this trip say they have been richly blessed from this opportunity to serve God by sharing that which God has so richly blessed. By using the God given talents to teach, witness, and share the saving knowledge of Jesus Christ - fifteen decisions were made. TO GOD BE THE GLORY!

We also have people from our association actively involved in missions abroad in Eastern Europe and Africa.

We have already begun a five year mission partnership with the Baptist Convention of New York. This is being coordinated through the North Carolina Home Missions Board. ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

Protection is an instinct each adult has toward his spouse and children. It hurts to see a child fall or a spouse passed over for a promotion. We want to shield loved ones from the hurts of everyday life.

That kind of protection is impossible, but there is financial protection available to ministers that can provide a life-saving margin for his family in the event of his disability or death. The good news is it costs him nothing if he is an eligible participant in the Church Annuity Plan.

The Protection Section of the Church Annuity Plan is provided by the state convention, and includes several benefits. These benefits can mean receiving:

- up to \$67,500 in special survivor benefits if you die prior to retirement, or while receiving a disability benefit.
- up to \$300 a month if you become disabled and unable to perform any gainful employment due to physical or mental incapacity.

Additionally, up to \$35 each month can be credited to your retirement income account during your disability and your survivor benefits will remain. This valuable family protection is funded from Cooperative Program dollars that match dollars contributed to your account by you and your church.

"The Church Annuity Plan offers significant up-front family protection that leaves your dollars free to build your retirement security. It is an important benefit that many ministers overlook in the retirement plan," Frank Schwall, senior vice president of Member Services.

The average annuitant in North Carolina receives \$287.43 per month, up from \$234 last year. North Carolina has 3,396 members making contributions to Annuity Board retirement plans.

It is exciting to think about what has been done to help ministers retire with dignity and to have protection as they plan for retirement. Strong efforts have been made to make all of our churches (and ministers) aware of the opportunities and the need to act on them.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

The year 1991 is significant in the history of Baptist Hospital - it marks the 50th anniversary of its entering a partnership with the Bowman Gray School of Medicine of Wake Forest University, to form one of the 126 academic medical centers in the nation. Appropriate events have been planned to celebrate this anniversary.

This partnership makes it possible for Baptist Hospital to offer it's patients the most advanced technology for diagnosing and treating their health problems. For example, ours is one of 15 medical centers in the nation involved in clinical trials of a new coronary laser which vaporizes plaque in blocked coronary arteries. We are one of five centers in the U.S. conducting clinical trials in stereotactic radiosurgery, a procedure in which high-energy beams of radiation from a linear accelerator are focused by computers on brain tumors and lesions to destroy them. This procedure can be done on an outpatient basis. We are one of 24 Comprehensive Cancer Centers in the nation. We are the designated organ procurement agency for northwest North Carolina, and we recently received approval to begin performing pancreatic transplants this year. Early in 1992, we expect to open our new Center for Positron Emission Tomography, one of the most advanced radiological services which is capable of measuring the chemical structure of the body. This new diagnostic procedure promises to make possible earlier detection, and hence, earlier treatment of tumors, hopefully, improving the outcome of the treatment.

During the past year, the hospital admitted approximately 22,000 patients, and almost 400,000 persons were treated through the various outpatient services of the Medical Center. These patients came from most counties in North Carolina, from 32 other states, and from several other countries.

During the past year, Baptist Hospital was re-accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Health Care Organizations, and the survey team which visited our institution ranked it in the top 10 percent of hospitals in the nation. Also, according to a recent report from the North Carolina Medical Database Commission, average charges for care at Baptist Hospital are 10 percent below the average charges for similar diagnoses in hospitals statewide, and substantially lower than charges in the other North Carolina academic medical centers.

The Pastoral Care Department, which is funded in part through the Cooperative Program, provided Clinical Pastoral Education to 42 students during the past year. The Pastoral Care staff provided more than 54,000 specific ministries to hospital patients, family members, and staff. And, the counseling division provided over 21,700 counseling sessions. The Professional staff of the Pastoral Care Department continues to respond to requests for help from churches in conflict, from pastors and their families across the state.

For the first time since 1978, a Mother's Day Offering exclusively for Baptist Hospital Benevolent Care was received in North Carolina Baptist Churches. At the time this report is being written, results of the Mother's Day Offering appear to be very favorable. The staff and patients at Baptist Hospital are profoundly grateful to North Carolina Baptists for this support.

CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION REPORT

A "new-old" event is about to take place in North Carolina Baptist life: A Special Committee!

From time to time we Baptists feel the need to take a hard look at ourselves. We do that through the time-honored practice of asking trusted people to serve on a committee for a year, sometimes two. In 1956, for example, "The Committee of Twenty-Five" began a comprehensive study which eventually embraced all aspects of North Carolina Baptist life. That committee reported to a special session of the Baptist State Convention called for that purpose on May 5-6, 1959. Again, "The Committee of Twenty," appointed in 1967, worked for two years before presenting its comprehensive findings and recommendations to the Convention in November of 1969. Both of these committees provided clarity and guidance for North Carolina Baptists which endured for many years.

New times call for a fresh look at ourselves. The "new times" which have taken shape in the Southern Baptist Convention since 1979 have particular relevance for institutions, agencies, their trustees and the Convention. North Carolina Baptist institutions and agencies have rendered distinguished Christian service for a total of 1,108 years! New times call for a new look by a competent special committee.

In May the General Board approved a 17-member "Institutions Relations Committee." Lamar Brooks, Wilmington, is chairman. Other members are: Jean P. Abernethy, Marion; Dot Allred, Gastonia; Curtis Lee Barbery, Bennett; Harold Bennett, Boone; Don Bolden, Burlington; Caralie Brown, Raleigh; Kathryn H. Hamrick, Shelby; John H. Hewett, Asheville; Milton A. Hollifield, Jr., Stanley; John M. Hough, Jr., Salisbury; James H. Johnson, Candler; Robert B. Poole, Elizabeth City; George W. Pullium, Jr., Knightdale; Hobart Smith, Charlotte; A. Eugene Warren, Charlotte; J.L. Wilson, Winston-Salem. Their report is due in November, 1992.

The "New-old" way of study and thought is the North Carolina Baptist, Triedand-true way to confront changing times. We thank these seventeen good men and women who will help us to shape the future together in harmony. They request and deserve our fervent prayers.

BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

The Board of Directors and the staff of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation are committed to effective leadership in generating increased perpetual financial support of Baptist causes throughout the state, nation and world. With assets approximately \$27 million (market value) at the end of the 1990 fiscal year, the income distribution to Baptist causes is significant each year.

Typically, assets are either held as endowments paying interest income in perpetuity to named Baptist causes, or they are held in trust with current income being paid to individuals and future income being paid to Baptist causes in perpetuity.

The staff of the Foundation consists of seven full-time employees and two persons who provide part-time service in accounting and legal services. The servicing of individual accounts requires continuous contact with trustors, donors and those designating gifts through Wills. The increased number of requests for assistance in seminars and conferences by churches, associations and individuals has made part-time assistance necessary in regions of the state some distance from the office.

There are continual improvements being made in available charitable estate planning computer software, constant changes in state and federal regulations which affect charitable estate planning and an increased need for technical training and assistance to serve the ever increasing needs of both the development staffs of our institutions and the individuals utilizing the Foundation services. The Foundation continues to provide for these needs to maximize the growth in financial support for Baptist causes.

In 1990, the Foundation moved into a new home. The 6,000 square foot office building was constructed from gifts from individuals and is located on property provided by the Baptist State Convention next to the Baptist Building in Cary. The new facility was occupied in February 1990 and provides much needed space for the work of staff as well as for conferences and meetings. Baptist groups are invited to use the meeting rooms when in the Raleigh/Cary area. We extend an invitation to church groups to call and arrange a visit to the newest building used for the Lord's service by North Carolina Baptists.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

For an institution that's 106 years old, Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina (BCH) looks strongly to the future! Three pillars that uphold that futuristic foundation are: 1. The return of the Thanksgiving Offering beginning in November 1991; 2. The success of our "Give a child a chance!" financial campaign, and 3. Baptists' continued support of BCH through the Cooperative Program.

This financial undergirding made it possible for BCH to serve more than 1,200 children and families last year through facilities at 13 locations across the state. Because Baptist cared enough to give, residents like Lynn will go to Wingate College this fall; Chris graduated from UNC-Chapel Hill; Jennifer is in her second year at Haywood Community College and Mark earned a football scholarship to North Carolina A&T. Each of these lives proceeds on firm footing because Baptist Children's Homes was there paved their pathway.

Most BCH residents come from dysfunctional families where a single parent, most often a mother, simply is unable to care for her children. Her frustration with life leads to limitless freedom for the children, which leads to troubling behavior. Physical abuse, divorce, alcohol, drugs and truancy mark their young lives.

Baptist Children's Homes provides a safe environment where children learn to name their problems and address them to change behavior. At the same time, willing family members also are addressing their problems with the help of BCH social workers. In many cases, children and families are restored.

BCH's "Give a child a chance!" campaign is raising \$11 million over three years to expand Cameron Boys Camp, boost general operating income and increase endowment. Gifts and pledges through July totaled \$9.3 million and response across the state has been overwhelming and heart gratifying.

Last year Baptist Men of North Carolina helped construct the new Tommy and Jeanie Eller Chuckwagon at Cameron Boys Camp that was dedicated May 19.

BCH celebrated this spring the 20th anniversary of the founding of Broyhill Home, our western-most campus, in Waynesville/Clyde. With the help of J.E. Broyhill and his family, the home was opened in 1971 on 91 hilly acres. It has capacity for 48 children in group care and for eight girls in emergency care.

In August 1990 BCH began Gregg Children's Center for before and after school care. The Davidson County program offers security to children of working couples, who now don't have to go home to empty houses.

Children's hopes the world over have been bolstered by the 1991 return of the Thanksgiving Offering voted by messengers to the 1989 state convention. While suffering through its 13-year absence, BCH lost more than \$2 million in potential gifts. Our goal this year is \$500,000. Because of a partnership established in December with the Baptist Children's Homes of Sao Paulo, Brazil, BCH-North Carolina will donate 10 percent of everything it receives over the \$500,000 goal for work in that desperately needy land.

In August 1990, BCH signed an agreement with Gaston County Department of Social Services to operate two emergency care homes owned by the county. That raises to seven the number of emergency care homes BCH operates. Emergency care, in which a child at risk of abuse or neglect can receive shelter right away, is the service most in demand throughout the state. Children stay a maximum of 60 days while BCH works with the custodian to determine a longterm plan of care.

The Cooperative Program continues to anchor our budget planning from the churches. We urge renewed commitment to cooperative giving among our North Carolina churches. It is essential, not only for us, but for the entire missions enterprise built painstakingly for a century and a half. Baptist Children's Homes receives \$1.5 million from Cooperative Program receipts each year. This is the stackpole around which we build our other income planning. A decrease in Cooperative Program dollars to Baptist Children's Homes would seriously jeopardize our ability to care for children.

Baptist Children's Homes has a 106-year history. But its history is just the knot that ties it to a boundless, unbroken ribbon of promise that stretches beyond the future to wrap children and families with eternal blessings.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

The following information was taken from the American Bible Society "Report to the Denominations - 1990." One thousand nine hundred forty six (1,946) languages now have at least one book of the Bible. Eighteen (18) languages got at least one book translated for the first time in 1990.

American Bible Society (ABS) representatives visited seminaries of thirteen (13) denominations in 1990. Of the 1000 contacts, most subscribed to the BIBLE CAUSE newsletter.

The "Gifts of Love" campaign — Bibles for the USSR and Central and Eastern Europe — has been extended because of the open doors and many requests there.

The "Heritage Program" began in 1990 to cultivate and strengthen the ABS partnership with various heritage and ethnic groups, including African Americans, Native Americans, Latino Americans, and Asian Americans.

ABS staff and volunteers provided informational display at 240 regional and denominational meetings. ABS provided a Scripture Center display stand to the 1200 plus Scripture Center volunteers in April 1991. Also a toll-free telephone line has been set up for the Scripture Center volunteers to place their orders more easily.

BIBLICAL TREASURES WITHIN is an informative brochure which is available and which describes the ABS Archives/Library program. Also there is an historic Bible collection. Groups wishing to tour the exhibit should contact Mary Ellen Gleason, SC, the Museum Education Coordinator at (212)408-1495.

In 1991 the ABS will publish the New Testament portion of the new CONTEM-PORARY ENGLISH VERSION (CEV). This translation aims at translating the original Greek texts into easily understandable reading for readers of all ages. The complete CEV Bible should be published by 1996.

The ABS is preparing study helps for use with the TODAY'S ENGLISH VER-SION (TEV) which will be available in 1992.

In 1990 Bible portions were targeted for groups in the United States ranging from people in school to the homeless. Also Bible studies "Power Source" and "Keeping Your Balance" were developed for children, youth and teenagers. The CEV and another Scripture Portion, "Discover Life Daily," are being made available to enhance Bible literacy among adults.

In 1990 the EVERY WORD SCRIPTURE STUDY SYSTEM became available with a word processor to allow Bible students to search the scriptures (TEV) on a computer and to incorporate the results of their search into a document. In 1991, a CD-ROM reader program, the ABS REFERENCE BIBLE, became available. It allows the user to search through more than two dozen databases which include different versions of the Bible, ancient writings, and study helps.

The ABS offers a Special Imprint Program which will include a picture of a specific church and facts about the congregation or worship schedules for use in evangelism, anniversaries, or large meetings. Additionally the ABS publishes information about its staff (ABS tracts) and about Bible Society work around the world (RECORD).

In 1990, 14,812,844 Southern Baptists gave \$312,705 to the ABS. That averages 2.1 cents per member. Since the ABS is working diligently to carry out the Great

BAPTIST RETIREMENT HOMES REPORT 1991: MAKING LIFE FOR OLDER ADULTS THE BEST OF TIMES

The Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc. operates four residential facilities for Older Adults around the State - the Albemarle Baptist Home in the Southern Piedmont, the Western North Carolina Baptist Home in Asheville, the Hamilton Baptist Home in Eastern North Carolina, and the Brookridge Retirement Community in Winston-Salem.

In Asheville, 1991 began with a great deal of excitement. After more than five years of trying to receive state approval to build a nursing care bed addition, the Baptist Retirement Homes was awarded a Certificate of Need for 100 medicaid certified nursing care beds for its Western North Carolina Baptist Home on Richmond Hill in Northwest Asheville. Currently the only nursing care provided by the Baptist Retirement Homes is the 85 bed nursing care unit at the Brookridge Retirement Community in Winston-Salem. The addition of 100 medicaid certified beds will mean that quality nursing care can be offered to Western North Carolina Baptists regardless of their ability to pay for the institutional services that they need.

The 39,000 square foot addition will cost approximately \$2.8 million. At the present time, the Baptist Retirement Homes has raised approximately \$2 million of the \$2.8 million needed to make this long hoped for dream a reality. Baptists across Western North Carolina are being urged to help Baptist Retirement Homes meet the financial challenge of building this new unit on Richmond Hill.

In Winston-Salem, the Brookridge Retirement Community completed its second year of operation. Under the leadership of a well-trained and committed Christian staff, the Brookridge Retirement Community's Independent Living area and Health Care Unit are considered among the finest in the state.

In Albemarle and Hamilton, Assisted Living care is provided to Older Adults in residential settings. The Albemarle and Hamilton facilities offer quality care to Older Adults regardless of their ability to pay for the cost of the care they receive - a service unmatched by any other church related long-term care institution in this state.



HISTORY OF ELK BAPTIST CHURCH

The early minutes of Elk Baptist Church are not available, but other records provide some information about its early days. Writings of Mr. W. A. Proffit state that the church was established in 1839, and met in a pole building near Hall's mill, which, I understand, was about three and a half miles up Elk Creek. Other records indicate that a Baptist church was constituted in 1833 at "Mouth of Elk," the fruition of an arm of Cove Creek Baptist Church, Three Forks Association, of what is now Watauga County. I have found no written record to satisfactorily reconcile these two dates and locations. Perhaps the first church did not survive, but inspired some of the local residents to organize a church up the creek a ways. Or perhaps the church organized in 1839 was not related to the earlier effort, because the new church affiliated with the Lewis Fork Association rather than Three Forks Association. When the annual meeting of the Lewis Fork Association convened at Zion Hill Meeting House in 1840, Elk Baptist Church was represented by Philip Walsh, J. Key and John J. Keller as delegates, but had no pastor. Records of this meeting show there were 19 members of Elk. The next record available is in 1844, when Rev. William Church was pastor, and there were 24 members.

We have no list of the charter members of Elk Baptist Church, but family names of Dula, Kendall, Keller, Pipes and Walsh appear frequently in early accounts of the church. In addition to Rev. Church, some of its pastors while Elk was in the Lewis Fork Association were William B. Brown, Benjamin Beach, Larkin Hodge and Burton Bradley. The annual meeting of the Lewis Fork Association convened at Elk in 1849. Rev. Larkin Hodge was then pastor, and Philip Walsh, Elbert K. Walsh and James Cattreli were delegates representing the 44 members.

In 1851, a rift germinated in the churches of this region and soon became the cause for major controversy and division. The question of church sanctioned abstinence from alcoholic beverages, and an associated question involving fellowship with members who joined the Sons of Temperance (a secret society), soon touched Elk Creek valley and the surrounding area. Within the Elk congregation, it is impossible at this date to know who was in favor of what, but it is very probable that there were members with very strong feelings on both sides of the issues, as well as those who were relatively neutral. Elk's membership dropped from 50 in 1850 - before the controversy developed - to 17 in 1855. Evidently the more radical elements of the congregation left to join other churches, because it appears that Elk Baptist Church did not wish to take a position on either side of the issues. In 1853, it, along with German Hill, Yadkin, Buffalo Cove, King's Creek, Dover, Union, Sardice, Liberty, Antioch, Bethany, Hollow Springs, and Lower Creek were dismissed from the Lewis Fork Association to join other associations. It is very

probable that this is about the time the church moved into a hewn log building about a mile down the creek at the lower end of the Ferguson Farm (Proffit place).

Elk was a charter member when the Lower Creek Association was formed in 1854. Thomas Kendall and Harvey Dula were delegates to the organizing assembly, but, again, Elk had no pastor. In his *History of North Carolina Baptists, Vol. 2,* Pascal writes that Lower Creek Association was formed by churches not willing to take sides in the temperance controversy. This division eventually widened to encompass the support of missions and Sunday school. Generally, those opposed to liquor; permissive of members belonging to secret societies; favoring missions and Sunday School were in one camp while those who felt the church should not interfere in the alcoholic beverage issue; excluded any member who joined a secret society; and opposed missions and Sunday School were in another.

Elk continued as a member of the Lower Creek Association until 1860. During that period, E. Tilley, Larkin Pipes, W. Bradshaw and S. Curtis served as pastors. Rev. Larkin Pipes soon became identified with the Missionary Baptists. The little church on Elk Creek began to recover from the split, and soon had 24 members. However, another question arose to trouble the congregation, the denomination, and the entire nation. Slavery! Should one person own another? Should North Carolina secede from the Union and become a member of the Confederate States of America where slavery would be sanctioned and encouraged? The moral issue could not be separated from the political one. Those having one view could not remain in fellowship with those having the other one. Members of the Elk congregation were not slave owners, and saw little reason to go to war, as they saw it, for the wealthy plantation masters.

In 1860, Buffalo Cove, Cool Spring, Elk, Stony Fork and Yellow Hill formed the new Stony Fork Association. Rev. Larkin Pipes represented Elk at the constituting assembly. Elk's membership was back down to 17. Dr. George W. Greene, in "The Baptists of the Upper Yadkin Valley," writes that this Association was made up of churches whose members were opposed to the secession of the southern states to form the Confederacy. Even with the slavery issue on their mind, the old issues of temperance, missions and Sunday School would not go away. Dr. Greene writes that the Stony Fork Association first received an offering for foreign missions in 1886, and became identified with Missionary Baptists in 1888 or 1889 when delegates were appointed to the Baptist State Convention. Annual minutes of the Stony Fork Association for the period 1861-1889 are not available, so we cannot see the effects the Civil War and these other distractions had on the Elk congregation.

When the minutes of the Stony Fork Association pick up again in 1890, Rev. I. C. Miller is pastor of Elk and there are 45 members. Mr. W. A. Proffit writes that in 1890 the church moved to a little boxed building being used as a school and located on top of the ridge on the east side of the creek about three-quarters of a mile further downstream. Rev. W. N. Church was also a pastor during this period, and the Land, Johnson, Foster and Dula families are often mentioned. It was soon after the church moved to this location, according to local folklore, that a group of members suspected another member of stealing chickens. Apparently hoping to prick his conscience, evoke a confession and, maybe, restitution, the group opened a feather pillow shortly before a church service and liberally scattered feathers outside the building. Whether this prank brought about the desired change in the suspect is not a part of the story, but from that day until the present the location has been known as "Feather Hill."

During the period 1897-1904, Elk is listed in the annual minutes of the Stony Fork Association, but the church was not represented at the annual meetings and no church letters were sent to the Association. Mr. Proffit writes, "... confusion came up and the church disintegrated."

Mr. Proffit continues, "In the meantime, a new school house was built one half mile east known as 'Bradley's Chapel.' There, in 1905, two young preachers, viz: Revs. Dan Wheeler and Noah Hampton, from the head of Elk, came and reorganized the church.'' The annual minutes of the Stony Fork Association agree with this account, as they record that in 1906 N. S. Hampton and D. M. Wheeler are pastors of the Elk congregation of 14 members. In addition to those two, during the next 23 years, a growing congregation is pastored by Revs. J.R.J. Annas, C. C. Carlton, J. T. Hendrix, G. W. Brown, G. Marsh Watson and George W. Sebastian. Membership peaks at 53, with the Land, Foster, Dula, Norris, Walsh and Proffit families mentioned frequently.

Elk moved into a newly constructed building in 1926. The Association minutes show it is valued at \$2,000 and has a seating capacity of 400. All member churches are encouraged to receive an offering to assist in retiring the debt on this facility. It is located near the Darby Road, down stream from the former locations, and near the already existing James McNeil Family Cemetery. (This is the present site of the church.) In 1926 it is also reported that a Sunday School recently has been organized, with Mr. W. A. Proffit as Superintendent, fifty-four enrolled and an average attendance of 45. The Stony Fork Association met in the new building at Elk in 1927. It is reported in 1929 that a Baptist Young Peoples Union (BYPU) has been organized.

Application for membership is made to the Brushy Mountain Association in 1930, and the messengers, F. L. Dula, J. J. McNeil and W. A. Proffit, are cordially welcomed into that Association. Rev. J. E. Driver is pastor, and there are 47 members. Other pastors since that time include Revs. Edd O. Miller, A. W. Eller, J. E. Hayes, E. C. Hodges, Walter Dula, R. C. Cooke, John R. Greene, H. Van Proffit, J. T. Hendrix, Jack D. Church, James R. Weaver, Raytee Greene, and Doug Triplett. Members of the Jones, Dula, Proffit, McNeil, Hall, Miller, Triplett, Allen, Edmiston, McGuire, Walsh, Eller, Shoemaker, Barlow, Church, Weaver and Greene families are identified in the Association minutes as representing the church in various capacities. The bond between Elk and the other member churches of Brushy Mountain Association has endured and grown during the past 62 years. The Association has met only once at Elk, in 1943.

From its beginning in 1926, the Sunday School has been well supported by the congregation. Under the guidance of Superintendents like W. A. Proffit, W. H. McGuire, Ruth Proffit, S. F. Miller, Mrs. S. F. Denny, Jim Edmiston, Chancy Triplett, Richard Walsh, E. C. Eller, Jr., James McNeil, Vernon M. Eller, Ottie M. Allen, Wilburn Campbell, Bruce Eller, Paul Hall and Barry Harris, there has been a reasonably steady increase in enrollment, standing at 127 in 1990. During some portions of this period, Womens Missionary Union and Brotherhood ministries flourished. The church has experienced some memorable revivals. There were 21 baptisms in Elk Creek in 1942 - the largest number for any year up to that time. However, with 22 baptized in 1991 the old record was eclipsed. Other very successful years were 1952 with 15 baptisms, and 1953 with 13 baptisms. Membership stood at 224 in 1991.

I have not found a record of ordinations prior to 1952. Deacons ordained since that date include: Jim Edmiston in 1953; Vernon Eller and Richard Walsh in 1968; Paul Hall, Wilborn Campbell and Theodore McNeil in 1981; and Bruce Eller and Barry Harris in 1989. Howard Van Proffit was ordained as a minister in 1957 and Vernon Maurice Eller in 1984.

The physical plant has been expanded to meet the needs of the congregation. Residents tell me that during the 1940 flood, waters of Elk Creek surrounded the building and lodged huge tree trunks around it. In 1954, the building was moved a few yards to higher ground, and turned to face the Darby Road. A basement was dug, two rooms were added and running water was installed. Over the years, the interior and exterior of the building have been remodelled and improved. It was brick veneered in 1967, 5 classrooms were built, a new furnace, new steeple and stained glass windows were installed. The parking lot was improved in 1971 and was paved in 1990. A handicapped ramp was built in 1990, along with other improvements. The interior was refurbished last year. The church property is now valued at \$250,000.

In addition to being the religous center of this rural community, Elk Baptist Church is also the social center. The minutes often mention the fun and fellowship enjoyed during homecomings, old fashioned days, watermelon feasts, chicken-Q's, and outings to Tweetsie. The visit in 1985 by a guest from the Haitian School for the Deaf, to which the church makes contributions, was a special event in the community.

Elk Baptist Church has enjoyed God's blessings and has built well during the 153 years of its recorded past.

Update to the HISTORY OF PURLEAR BAPTIST CHURCH

A very thorough history of Purlear Baptist Church from its organization on November 6, 1932 through 1952 was written by Mr. J. F. Jordan and printed in the annual minutes of the Association in 1952. That time period will not be covered in this update.

Having moved into their new brick building in 1949, the church was in a position to serve the physical needs of the congregation and had room to grow. This is borne out by the very successful revival, conducted in April, 1955 by Hunter Church and Wayne Hendren, which resulted in 14 professions, and 11 additions by other methods. A Brotherhood was organized in 1955, and Women's Missionary Union in 1956.

Dedication services were on May 6, 1956. With the new building paid for, the church has continued a program of improving and upgrading the physical plant. The basement was finished in 1957. A well was dug in 1958. The parking lot was paved in 1967. The interior of the sanctuary was remodelled in 1973. An addition, including a kitchen, fellowship hall and two classrooms, was built in 1976. The older classrooms were renovated in 1981. The church bought slightly more than

four acres of land adjoining their property in 1982. A separate fund for cemetery maintenance was also started in 1982. The front of the church was renovated, with new lighting installed, in 1986. The church became incorporated in 1987. The property is now valued at \$150,000.

Rev. Glenn Huffman continued to serve as pastor until 1954. Pastors since that time have included Revs. Hunter Church (1955-1960), Richard Byrd (1960-1962), Walter T. Whittington (1962-1963), Tommy Privette (1963-1965), Wade Phillips (1966-1969), Hugh Hayes (1969-1972), Rex Eldreth (1973-1977), Earl B. Sheets (1977-1980), Leon Church (1980-1984), Tom Vannoy (1984-1990) and Hadley Triplett (1990 - present). During this period, the Sunday School Directors have included D. C. Whittington (1952-1955), D. F. Beshears (1955-1967, 1970-1978, and 1983-1985), Ted R. Nichols (1967-1969), Tom Wake Hayes (1969-1970), Clayton Yates (1978-1980), Fred McNeil (1981-1982), Bryant Yates (1986-1990) and Ursel Huffman (1991 - present).

A presbytery was convened on July 12, 1970 to ordain Dale Hayes, Paul McNeil, James Spears, Edd Huffman, Wayne Yates and D. F. Beshears as deacons. Clayton Yates, Bryant Yates, Bill Nichols, Fred McNeil and Tommy Hayes were ordained as deacons on August 7, 1983. Roy Grayum was licensed to preach on August 25, 1974, and Steve Allen Church was licensed on October 25, 1987.

From a total membership of 146 in 1952, the church reached a peak of 240 members in 1975. As with many churches, Purlear has not been able to sustain this peak, and its membership had dropped to 220 in 1991. Sunday School enrollment was 148 in 1952. It peaked at about 190, and now stands at 110. The church actively supported the Wilkes Evangelistic Crusade in 1981, and participated in the "Good News, America!" and "Here's Hope" simultaneous revivals in 1985 and 1989. It is currently providing some financial assistance to a local student who is attending Southeastern Seminary.

HISTORY OF SHADY GROVE BAPTIST CHURCH

The first entry in the original minute book of Shady Grove Baptist Church is as follows: (Information in parenthesis has been added for clarification.)

"North Carolina, Wilkes County, Sept. 12, 1880

"According to appointment, the members dismissed from Cub Creek Baptist Church met on the Laws Hill four (and a) half miles above Wilkesboro in order to be constituted into a church. Divine services were held by Elders Benjamin Ashley and Franklin Eller.

"Then J. W. Kilby was called to (take a) seat with the Presbytery. Letters of the following were then examined. B. M. Pardew¹ and wife, R. F. Jarvis² and wife, N. E. Pardew³, J. L. Pardew⁴, A. T. Pardew⁵ and Emely Childers⁶ received by Presbytery, then examined on articles of faith and found to be orthodox. Their duty was then explained to them. The members above were then constituted into a church in solemn form by the name of Shady Grove. Church elected Elder Benjamin Ashley pastor, and A. T. Pardew clerk. Meeting ruled by second Saturday in each month. Then decided that this church be attached to the Elkin Association. Then appointed a Presbytery to write a constitution of this church. Church door was then opened for reception of members when three came forward, to wit, L. L. Jarvis⁷, W. F. Jarvis⁸ and B. G. Pardew⁹ and joined by experience and received into fellowship after baptism. Total number - eleven.

"On motion the church was dismissed. J. W. Kilby, Clerk" From these eleven members, Shady Grove has grown to its present membership of 123.

As best we can determine, Shady Grove first met in a brush arbor near the present location of the church. On January 8, 1881, the church decided to hold meetings in the Adley school house until warmer weather, and in December 1882, suspended meetings until March 1883. While the exact date is not recorded, a building was erected prior to April 9, 1887 when the church approved the purchase of a stove for \$8. It is believed that this original building was the wooden structure to which classrooms and brick veneering have been added, and is a part of the existing facility.

Mrs. Gertrude J. Eller first remembers the building in 1912, when it was a oneroom weather boarded structure, covered with wooden shingles, and having a stove in the aisle for heat. She also remembers when people traveled for miles in wagons or buggies, on horseback or afoot to attend the church services which were held on one Saturday and Sunday in each month. Annual revival services were held mornings and evenings during the week, and were sometimes extended to two weeks. The guest speaker and the pastor were usually invited to stay in the home of church members during the revival period.

In 1889, the church acquired two acres of land adjoining their property - one acre from Bevel M. Pardue and another acre from John and Alpha Parsons. Over the years, the church has enlarged and modernized its facilities. The interior was refinished in 1945. Sunday School rooms were added in 1958. The structure was brick veneered in 1960 and an easement was granted to the US Corps of Engineers to build a road leading to the dam. A 15 x 28 ft. addition containing two class-rooms and hall was built in 1969. The sanctuary was carpeted, a new roof, steeple and colored glass windows were installed in the early 1970's. Air conditioning was added in 1978, and new rest-rooms in 1979. Dogwood trees were planted around the cemetery in 1982. A front porch was built in 1983, and the pews were re-worked in 1985. New picnic tables and shelter were built in 1986. A project to pave the parking lot is underway, and should be completed as soon as final approval is received from the Corps of Engineers. The church property is now valued at more than \$100,000.

Twenty-three pastors have served Shady Grove. They are Revs. Benjamin W. Ashley (1880-1881), Milton McNeill (1881-1889, 1902-1903 and 1917-1921), Ansel T. Pardue (1889-1896 and 1904-1906), Richard F. Jarvis (1896-1898), G. M. Burcham (1898-1900 and 1910-1916), J. J. Beach (1900-1902), George Hamby (1903-1904), Lewis B. Murray (1906-1910), Isaac Watts (1921-1925), Alfred J. Foster (1925-1930), Ed O. Miller (1930-1935), B. Lee Minton (1935-1939), D. C. Clanton (1939-1941), J. Glenn Huffman (1941-1943), C. Lester Johnson (1943-1945), Gilbert Osborne (1945-1950), Albert Pruitt (1950-1953), Garfield Cardwell (1953-1959 and 1963-1969), Albert Byrd (1959-1960), Garland Reeves (1960-1963 and 1968-1970), Wade Phillips (1967-1968 and 1970-1972), Floyd Minton (1972-1975) and Hubert L. Bullis (1975-present).

Ansel T. Pardue was ordained as a minister by Shady Grove on July 12, 1884, Richard F. Jarvis on June 9, 1888, Floyd Minton on October 15, 1972 and Hubert L. Bullis on December 14, 1975. Deacons who have been ordained by Shady Grove include Huston Jones Steelman and James Lloyd Pardue (Jan. 18, 1885), Hamilton Joines and Daniel J. Pardue (Mar 12, 1898), Marshall Church, Thomas Irving Eller (1932), Earl Anderson and W. Guy Eller (1948), Alfred Phillips, Howard Moore and Floyd Minton (Sep 5, 1965), D. C. Owens (Mar 27, 1966), William Glenn Walker and Bruce Webb (Dec 11, 1977), and William Howard Owens, Jr. (June 24, 1979).

It appears that a Sunday School existed from the time the church was constituted, or maybe even before. Mrs, Cornelia Gilreath Bumgarner remembers hearing her mother, the former Lodemia Lucinda Jarvis, tell that when her family moved from North Wilkesboro to Adley in the late 1870's, Lodemia and the community children cleaned out an old sheep shed on their property and held Sunday School there. The exact date cannot be established, but it was probably a year prior to the constitution of Shady Grove, and was certainly before their building was constructed. Shortly after the first church building was completed, Sunday School was officially organized and Robert P. Yates was elected Superintendent on March 12, 1887. The use of quarterlies and cards was adopted on June 8, 1889. Other Sunday School Superintendents/Directors include Johnny Joines, James Pardue, Finley Joines, Daniel J. Pardue, Richard F. Jarvis, Huston Jones Steelman, M. S. Church, Marcus G. Steelman, I. Crosby Church, Jesse Church, W. L. Wiles, Marshall Church, Thomas Bumon Jarvis, Mrs. Irene Bumgarner, Mrs. Earl Anderson, David Knox Greene, Guy Eller, Earl Anderson, Hafford Baker, Mrs. D. K. Greene, Mrs. Gertrude J. Eller, Mrs. Louise Phillips, Mrs. Myrtle Minton, Hubert Bullis and Alfred Phillips. Sunday School enrollment is now 63.

The church supports an active community ministry. Women's Missionary Union was organized in 1989. Various outings and social events are enjoyed for fellowship as well as to honor special groups and recognize important milestones in the lives of members. The church observed its centennial in 1980. Shady Grove is fortunate to have a bell received from Jesse Walsh in 1948, and the original church organ, still in beautiful condition, received from Mrs. Hazel Moore in 1990, to remind the members of their rich heritage. The church sold the organ more than 50 years ago when a piano was acquired. It had been in the John and Nora Walsh family during the intervening years.

Shady Grove requested to be dismissed from the Elkin Association in 1889, and on August 20, 1891 messengers Robert P. Yates, Bennette Steelman and James Lloyd Pardue were accepted and seated at the twentieth annual meeting of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association. Brushy Mountain Association has met only once at Shady Grove. The thirty-second annual meeting convened there in 1903. A history of the church has not been previously printed in the Association minutes.

²Richard F. Jarvis married Martha Ann Pardue, daughter of Bevel M. and Prudence E. Padgett Pardue. He was later an ordained minister.

³Nancy Elizabeth Pardue was a daughter of Bevel M. and Prudence E. Padgett Pardue. She later married Huston Jones Steelman.

⁴James Lloyd Pardue was a son of Bevel M. and Prudence E. Padgett Pardue.

⁵Ansel T. Pardue was a son of Bevel M. and Prudence E. Padgett Pardue. He was ordained into the ministry and became a well known preacher in Wilkes County.

⁶Emily Pardue Childress was a daughter of Bevel M. and Prudence E. Padgett Pardue. While her married surname is spelled "Childress" in the original entry, the family usually spells it "Childress" today.

Update to the HISTORY OF WILKESBORO BAPTIST CHURCH

The history of Wilkesboro Baptist Church, written by Mr. J. F. Jordan, appears in the 1952 annual minutes of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association. Updates have been printed in 1970 and 1974.

Rev. Alfred Andrews continues as pastor, having completed 19 years in that service. During that period, he has seen major expansions in the physical plant and church ministries, as well as in membership and attendance.

Rev. Phillip Stone served as Minister of Education and Youth from 1975 to 1982. He resigned to accept the position of Youth Associate in the Sunday School Department of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention. He was succeeded by Rev. Hal Melton, who served during the next four years. In 1986, he resigned to also accept a position with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention. Rev. Roy Dobyns accepted the call as Minister of Education and Youth in 1986 and still serves in that capacity. During the tenures of these three ministers, Wilkesboro has experienced an active youth ministry. Perhaps the highlights of the youth program have been their summer mission trips. In 1984, an enthusiastic group served in Peoria, IL. Nokomis, IL was their destination in 1986. They traveled to Beckley, WV in 1987, to New Orleans, LA in 1989 and to Lancaster, NY in 1991.

Mr. Craig Little began his service as Church Music Director in 1978 and led the ministry in music for the next 14 years. "Cradle the King with Praise," the adult choir Christmas cantata in 1984, was telecast on three channels. Mr. Little and Rev. Stone collaborated to produce a special musical tribute for the churc.. centennial celebration in 1980.

Intensive research and planning for the centennial observance started in 1977, when Mrs. Lillian Foster was named coordinator of the Centennial Steering Committee. A history of the church, titled *From Village Ministry to Bold Missions*, written by Clara Downing Kneece and edited by the Church History Committee, presents highlights of the first hundred years of the church in narrative and pictures. Before September 6-7, 1980, the dates chosen for the centennial celebration, Mrs. Foster had written a historical pageant which she directed that Saturday night. On Sunday, former pastors, Revs. N. C. Teague, Robert L. Franklin, T. Sloan Guy, Jr., and Henry Morgan spoke during the special observance, and the program of special music was enjoyed by all present.

On February 27, 1980, the church licensed Phillip Billings and Bill Stone to preach. Phillip Billings was ordained to the ministry on May 16, 1982. Mr. Carlos Pardue served as a special missionary to Togo during March-April, 1986. He and

his wife, Betty, were missionaries to Arusha, Tanzania from October 1987 to September 1988. In July 1991, the Pardues returned to Tanzania, remaining there until April 1992. Dr. and Mrs. Larry Kilby have traveled to various destinations in the western hemisphere to provide medical services to the local populace. Deacons ordained during the period covered by this update are: Bill Brady, Larry Farthing, Remer Dekle, Pat McNeil, Terry Bunn, Phillip Billings, Hadley Hayes, Larry Kilby, Richard Absher, Manson Alley, Robert Joines, John Burnette, Steve Spann, Ed Osborne, Charles Jones, R. G. Absher, Alan Whittington, Judson Kneese, Marsh Lyall, Doug Rollins, Bill Warden, Hal Caviness, Tom Furr, Tam Hutchinson and Steve Melton. Those who have served as Sunday School Director are Ralph Langley, John Q. Myers, Robert Joines, Tom Welborn and Doug Rollins.

The church approved a pre-school program for two, three and four-year olds to begin in 1991. The possibility of dual worship services each Sunday morning was raised in late 1991 and is under study. A "Single Again" ministry was organized in March, 1992, and a new senior adult group, the "Prime Timers" was organized two months later.

Recognizing their need for an enlarged physical facility, the church approved purchase of the Somers property, adjacent to the church, in 1979. In 1980, the Spicer property was donated to the church, and a study to determine its best use was commenced. Parsonage renovation was completed in 1981. An Allen 705 digital computer organ was purchased in 1982 for installation in the sanctuary. Purchase of the Faw property was approved in 1984. Later in 1984, Mr. Alvin Sturdivant was elected chairman of the Building Committee and in 1986 plans for a new educational and fellowship building were approved. The building program also included plans for improvement and repair of the existing buildings.

With good progress being made on construction of the new building, Mrs. Bonnie L. Rhodes and Mrs. Nancy Jenkins were named co-chairpersons of the Dedication Committee on January 27, 1988. Dedication of the new fellowship hall and education facility was on June 5, 1988. Former pastors Robert L. Franklin and Henry Morgan, with their wives, as well as former ministers of education and youth Earl Webb, Mabel Couch, Phil Stone and Hal Melton, with their spouses, were present for this occasion.

In October 1988, Phase II of the building program was approved. This phase was essentially completed by mid-1989. On March 4, 1990, Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Sturdivant were recognized and presented with a hand-carved statuette of a carpenter as a token of appreciation for their service and leadership through the five-year construction project.

After 25 years service as Pastor's Secretary and Financial Secretary, Mrs. Lillian Foster retired at the end of 1990.

Wilkesboro Baptist has experienced a 63% growth in church membership during the period of this history update, rising from 635 members in 1974 to 1,033 in 1991. Growth in Sunday School enrollment has been even more spectacular, rising from 451 in 1974 to 813 in 1991, an increase of 80%. Sunday School average attendance has not quite kept pace with enrollment, but is still commendable considering the general trend in this statistic. Average attendance in 1974 was 268 and grew 29%, to 346, in 1991. The value of church property is now in excess of \$2.1 million.

Constitution

PREAMBLE

We, the Baptist Churches of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association, unite according to the plan and for the purpose and work of New Testament churches in our world. To this end and according to the following articles, we cooperate to the fullest extent possible with the State and Southern Baptist Convention and subscribe to the principles of the 1963 *Baptist Faith and Message* statement.

ARTICLE I - NAME

This body shall be known as the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association of North Carolina.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Association to consider and promote measures for increasing the harmony, the knowledge and the spiritual life of the churches and for developing and directing their energies and their contributions in the advancement of Christ's kingdom throughout the earth, always in harmony with the teachings of the New Testament. This Association shall be an auxiliary of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in all their missionary, educational and benevolent work.

To accomplish this purpose, the association shall seek to: (1) enhance the fellowship among member churches; (2) present the Gospel of Jesus Christ to everyone in our area; (3) encourage and facilitate church growth and development and provide other services to the churches; (4) coordinate mission ministries in our area and promote cooperation in state, home and foreign missions; and, (5) provide an additional channel by which member churches may interact with Southern Baptist agencies and institutions.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches desiring to affiliate with it. Any church desiring to become a member of the Association shall present, through messengers chosen for that purpose, its request for membership on APPLICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP form provided in the minutes along with a UNIFORM ASSOCIATIONAL LETTER provided by the clerk, at any annual session of the body. The moderator shall refer the application to the Committee on Membership for study and investigation. The church shall maintain for the year the status of associate membership until the committee makes its recommendation. If favorable, it will be received into full membership with all the rights and privileges at the next annual session. If the Association then votes to receive the church, the moderator shall extend the hand of fellowship to the messengers.

SECTION 2. The Association shall be sole judge of its membership and may receive churches, or reject churches, according to its Constitution and Bylaws. Member churches may withdraw from the Association as they desire. Any church in the Association which fails to cooperate with the Association shall, upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee of the Association, be contacted by the Membership Committee to determine the intentions of the church regarding its remaining in the Association.

A cooperating church shall be defined as one which sends an annual report to the Association and messengers to Associational meetings, and contributes to the financial program of the Association.

SECTION 3. The Association shall withdraw fellowship from any church in its membership which shall be found to be disorderly in faith and practice, but not written charges are brought against it, which charges shall have been authorized by the official act of the church offering the same, or by the Membership Committee of the Association. Thereafter, any such charges shall be carefully considered by the Association at its next annual session.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The Annual Session of the Association shall be held on Monday and Tuesday following the first Sunday in October.

SECTION 2. The Mid-Year Meeting shall be held on Monday following the first Sunday in April.

SECTION 3. The Association may be called into special session, if necessary, by a majority vote of the Executive Committee, provided the churches are given two weeks' notice and announcement of the purpose of the meeting.

SECTION 4. In case of emergency, the Executive Committee shall have the authority to change the time and/or place of meetings, and shall be responsible for providing churches with sufficient notice of change.

SECTION 5. Each church is entitled to be represented by its pastor, other ordained ministers holding membership in the church, and such additional messengers as will permit a total of 10 messengers. Churches with more than 500 members are entitled to an additional messenger for each 100 members more than the initial 500. Messengers shall be elected annually for all Associational meetings. It is suggested that at least five of the messengers be leaders of individual church organizations.

ARTICLE V - AUTHORITY

While independent and sovereign in its own sphere, the Association does not claim, and will never attempt to exercise any authority over any other Baptist Body, whether church or auxiliary organization.

ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTION

SECTION 1. Officers of this Association shall be the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Trustees, Brotherhood Director, Church Training Director, Evangelism Director, Missions Development Director, Music Director, Stewardship Director, Sunday School Director, Vacation Bible School Director, and Woman's Missionary Union Director.

SECTION 2. The Brotherhood Director, Church Training Director, Evangelism Director, Missions Development Director, Music Director, Stewardship Director, Sunday School Director, Vacation Bible School Director and Woman's Missionary Union Director shall be elected at the April Mid-Year Meeting. All other officers will be elected at the Annual Session. The nominees shall be contacted and nominated by the Nomination Committee. Nominations may also be made from the floor.

SECTION 3. Officers shall serve for a term of one year, unless stated otherwise, and shall assume their duties at the close of the meetings at which they are elected. SECTION 4. Whenever vacancies occur during the year, the Nominating Committee will present the names of replacements at a regular meeting of the Executive Committee for approval. These will serve until the close of the next Annual Session or until successors are elected.

SECTION 5. Any person having served two terms as Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election for a period of two years.

ARTICLE VII - TRUSTEES AND THEIR ELECTION

There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one of whom should be an attorney. Trustees shall be elected for an indefinite term and shall serve at the pleasure of the Association.

ARTICLE VIII - THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. Membership: The Executive Committee shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the Representative on the General Board of the Baptist State Convention, the ministers who are pastors in the Association, and one lay representative elected by each church, and the chairmen of all standing committees of the Association.

SECTION 2. Duties: The Executive Committee shall have the authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by the Constitution. The Executive Committee shall carry out other requirements as set forth in this Constitution and Bylaws. It shall be the duty of this committee to meet in January and July, and to make reports and recommendations to the Association at its Annual Session. Twenty members shall constitute a quorum to transact business after notice of such meetings has been given to all members. The Officers of this committee shall be the Moderator, the Vice-Moderator and the Clerk of the Association, who shall be the Secretary. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to see that the committee meets at least quarterly and at any other time deemed necessary. All other provisions of this constitution and Bylaws notwithstanding, the Executive Committee shall not be empowered to convey property, incur long-term indebtedness, nor employ or terminate personnel.

ARTICLE IX - MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL

SECTION 1. Membership: The Missions Development Council shall be composed of the Program Directors of the Association and the Director of Missions, who shall serve as chairman.

SECTION 2. Duties: The Missions Development Council shall be convened at least quarterly, by the Chairman, with called meetings as required. The Council shall plan and promote the programs and interests of the Association. The Council shall: (1) Initiate, review and recommend plans for involving officers, organizations, and committees in attaining the goals of the Association; (2) Study the needs of the churches and people of the Association; (3) Serve as a Calendar Committee in accordance with Bylaw IV. The Council should concern itself with the preparation of the Associational Calendar and present it to the Annual Session for consideration. Any committee chairperson may attend the council meeting at any time to present plans and programs involving that committee.

Bylaws

BYLAW I - GENERAL

SECTION 1. The Association shall convene as provided by the Constitution (Article IV, Section 1, 2, 3, 4).

SECTION 2. Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercise.

SECTION 3. A majority of the members present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of any business except the matter of making changes in the Constitution.

SECTION 4. Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator, shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration and avoid the use of unnecessary personalities.

SECTION 5. The members shall observe toward the officers and towards one another such courtesies as are becoming to Christians.

SECTION 6. The annual Associational year, for the purpose of reporting statistical information, shall be September 1 to August 31, inclusive.

BYLAW II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. Moderator

The Moderator shall preside over meetings of the body according to the constitution and bylaws. He shall be chairman of the Executive Committee and be exofficio member of all other committees. He shall see that the Executive Committee meets in January and July and at any other time deemed necessary. He shall be elected for one year and shall not succeed himself after the second consecutive year.

SECTION 2. Vice-Moderator

The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence, or at the pleasure of the Moderator, and shall be vice chairman of the Executive Committee.

SECTION 3. Clerk

The Clerk shall provide annual report forms at least 30 days before the October meeting, distribute at the October meeting copies of a digest of these reports, make an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distribution of minutes, records, and other documents of the Association, and serve also as secretary of the Executive Committee.

SECTION 4. Treasurer

The Treasurer shall receive and bank all funds of the Association in the name of the Association; disburse the same upon instructions from the Association, its Executive Committee, or as designated in the budget; render an accurate report of receipts and disbursements and distribute same at the October meeting; give an oral report at each regular meeting of the Association or its Executive committee; and keep books available and up-to-date for examination.

The Treasurer shall serve as a member of the Committee on Finance.

The Chairman of the Committee on Finance shall have authority to act for the Treasurer in the event the Treasurer is incapacitated.

SECTION 5. Auditor

The Auditor shall, at the close of the fiscal year, make an audit of the Treasurer's records.

ARTICLE X - COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The Association shall have the following standing committees with terms of office being from the close of the October meeting through the following October meeting:

A. To be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected at the October meeting:

- 1. Committee on Personnel (Bylaw III, Section 1)
- 2. Committee on Youth (Bylaw III, Section 2)
- 3. Committee on Evangelism (Bylaw III, Section 3)
- 4. Committee on Finance (Bylaw III, Section 4)
- 5. Committee on Ordinations (Bylaw III, Section 5)
- 6. Committee on Memorials (Bylaw III, Section 6)
- 7. Committee on Nominations (Bylaw III, Section 7)
- 8. Committee on Constitution (Bylaw III, Section 8)
- 9. Committee on Membership (Bylaw III, Section 9)
- 10. Committee on Properties (Bylaw III, Section 14)
- 11. Committee on Calendar (Bylaw III, Section 15)
- 12. School of Christian Studies Committee (Bylaw III, Section 16)
- 13. Committee on Enrollment (Bylaw III, Section 13)
- 14. Committee on Place and Preacher (Bylaw III, Section 11)
- 15. Committee on Resolutions (Bylaw III, Section 12)
- 16. Program Planning Committee (Bylaw III, Section 17)
- 17. Mission Ministries Committee (Bylaw III, Section 18)
- B. Committee on Committees appointed by Moderator at mid- year meeting.

ARTICLE XI - GENERAL PROVISIONS

SECTION 1. The employment of a Director of Missions shall follow the procedure outlined in Bylaw VI, Section 1, with the understanding that said person be extended an indefinite call and that a period of reasonable notice be given by either the missionary or the Association in the event of termination of such employment.

SECTION 2. The Director of Missions shall be empowered to procure and supervise necessary secretarial and janitorial personnel for the proper operation and maintenance of the Associational office, provided that funds for the hiring and salary of such personnel have been included within the current year's budget.

SECTION 3. All questions of order not herein provided for shall be decided according to *Robert's Rules of Order, Revised*.

SECTION 4. Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any annual session upon vote of two-thirds of the members present, provided that such amendments be presented on the first day of the annual session and voted upon the second day.

SECTION 5. ROTATING OF COMMITTEES. One-third of each committee shall be elected to serve a period of three years. Committees or parts of committees composed of program directors shall not be subject to rotation. No member shall succeed himself for more than one additional term. Vacancies occurring during the year may be filled by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 6. SPECIAL ADVISORS. The Moderator and Director of Missions will serve on all committees of the Association as special advisors.

SECTION 6. Historian

The Historian, in his sole discretion, shall collect facts of interest to the Association and the cooperating churches, and shall make a report to each annual session of the Association.

SECTION 7. Program Directors

The Program Directors of the Association shall include the Directors of Sunday School, Church Training, Brotherhood, WMU, Music, Evangelism, School of Christian Studies, and such special missions project coordinators as may be selected in response to ministry projects adopted by the Association. These shall be in charge of their respective organizations during their tenure of service.

BYLAW III - DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. Committee on Personnel

The Committee on Personnel shall be composed of six members, each of whom will serve a tenure of three years, with two members rotating off the Committee each year. The Committee will prepare and update, as necessary, position descriptions of all Associational staff personnel, excluding the Director of Missions whose responsibilities are described by Bylaw VI. It shall survey the need for additional staff positions; recruit, interview, and recommend to the Association or its Executive Committee new employed personnel; and, when necessary, recommend to the Executive Committee the termination of employment of staff personnel. The Committee shall review annually salaries and benefits, and make recommendations to the Finance Committee. It shall review at least annually the performance of each employee, receive any grievance, and otherwise seek to promote harmonious relationships between all employees of the Association.

SECTION 2. Committee on Youth

The Committee on Youth shall be composed of six (6) members, one of which shall be a minister who shall serve as chairman. The committee shall be concerned with ways of relating youth to the churches of the Association and shall lead the churches and association to plan programs and activities that will meet their needs.

SECTION 3. Committee on Evangelism

The Committee on Evangelism, composed of three members, shall promote the work of Evangelism within the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs shall be subject to approval by the Association or its Executive Committee. The Evangelism Committee shall be chaired by the Director of Evangelism.

SECTION 4. Committee on Finance

A. The Committee on Finance, composed of six members and the Treasurer, shall study the Association's financial needs for an adequate program, prepare and present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise and develop plans for securing the cooperation of churches in providing funds to meet the budget, and make a written report at the October meeting.

B. In the event it becomes necessary to borrow funds for current operating expenses of the Association, the Committee on Finance is authorized to instruct the Trustees to secure by loan an amount not to exceed 10 percent of the annual budget for a period not to exceed 90 days, and to renew the loan as needed. SECTION 5. Committee on Ordinations

The Committee on Ordinations, composed of seven ministers, shall when

requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of candidates for the Gospel Ministry. Churches wishing to ordain ministers are requested to place their candidates before the Committee at least 30 days prior to the date set for examination on the following principles:

a. Christian experience or conversion

- b. Call to the ministry
- c. Attitude toward denominational work and objects
- d. Support of denominational causes
- e. Moral and spiritual fitness
- f. Doctrinal beliefs
- g. Biblical knowledge

Candidates are to be ordained with the assistance of this Committee only when they are serving a church or churches as pastor or having been called as pastor of a Baptist church of like faith and practice with those member churches of this Association.

No candidate for ordination shall be considered by the committee who has not been a member of a cooperating church for at least one year. The Committee shall consider only male members for ordination.

Candidates are to be urged to prepare themselves for the ministry as far as possible in Baptist institutions of higher learning.

This Committee shall not recommend any candidate for ordination whom they feel will not bring honor and esteem to the Lord, to Southern Baptist and to the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association.

Recommendations will be made by the Committee to the church where the candidate holds membership. The Committee will assist the church in the ordination service at a time convenient to the church and to the members of the Committee if such assistance is desired.

SECTION 6. Committee on Memorials

The Committee on Memorials, composed of three members, shall bring a report at the October meeting and lead in a memorial service in memory of those reported by the churches as deceased since the last annual meeting.

SECTION 7. Committee on Nominations

The Committee on Nominations, composed of seven members, shall contact and nominate at the April or October meeting of the Association, the officers and representatives of the Association according to Article VI of the Constitution.

SECTION 8. Committee on Constitution

The Committee on Constitution, composed of five members, shall be available to study any changes or revisions in the Constitution, and to make recommendations as needed to keep the Constitution in line with the policies and programs of the Association.

SECTION 9. Committee on Membership

The Committee on Membership, composed of five (5) members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution, Article III.

SECTION 10. Committee on Committees

The Committee on Committees, composed of seven (7) members, shall be appointed by the Moderator at the mid-year meeting, and shall nominate persons to be elected by the Association to serve on all standing committees.

SECTION 11. Committee on Place and Preachers

The Committee on Place and Preachers, composed of three (3) members, shall

receive or solicit invitations for the place or places for meetings of the Association, and shall recommend the places. It shall also recommend the preachers and alternates for the annual sermons.

SECTION 12. Committee on Resolutions

The Committee on Resolutions, composed of three (3) members, shall draw up and present to the Association at the October meeting resolutions of appreciation and any other resolution it may deem expedient.

SECTION 13. Committee on Enrollment

The Committee on Enrollment, composed of five (5) members, shall prepare for and direct the enrollment of messengers at all sessions of Associational meetings. Each messenger shall be enrolled only once during the October meeting. This Committee shall be prepared to report on enrollment when called for during meetings.

SECTION 14. Properties Committee

The Properties Committee, composed of three (3) members, shall be responsible for the maintenance of all properties owned or leased by the Association or its Trustees.

SECTION 15. The Calendar Committee

The Calendar Committee shall be composed of the following Associational officers: Director of Missions, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, WMU Director, Brotherhood Director, Director of Music Ministry, and President of the Ministers' Conference. This Committee shall prepare an Associational calendar for the year, and present same to the annual meeting for adoption. This calendar shall be included in the annual.

SECTION 16. School of Christian Studies Committee

The School of Christian Studies Committee shall work with the Director of the School of Christian Studies to plan, promote, and implement the offering of such courses of study as will meet the needs of pastors and laypersons in the areas of biblical studies, historical theology, Baptist life, church administration, Christian education, and pastoral training.

SECTION 17. Program Planning Committee

The Program Planning Committee shall be composed of five (5) members. It shall be their responsibility to prepare the agenda and arrange for speakers (other than the two primary messages of the Annual Meeting which are the responsibility of the Place and Preacher Committee) for all plenary meetings of the association.

SECTION 18. Mission Ministries Committee

The Mission Ministries Committee shall be composed of five (5) persons who shall be chosen so as to be representative of each geographical division of the associational area. It shall be the responsibility of this committee to discover, evaluate, and recommend mission and/or ministry needs for the consideration of the Associational Missions Development Council and thence to the Association in session. This committee shall be represented by its chairperson on the Missions Development Council.

BYLAW IV - REPRESENTATIVES

SECTION 1. The Nominating Committee in its report to the Annual Meeting shall nominate the following representatives: Children's Homes, Christian Education, Foreign Missions, Retirement Homes, Home Missions, Hospital, Annuity Board, Religious Literature, State Missions. SECTION 2. These representatives shall familiarize themselves with the work of the institution or agency which they represent. They shall promote the work and encourage churches to support it. They shall secure or write a report on their institution or agency. If called upon by the Program Committee they shall make a report at the Annual Session. In any case they shall prepare their report to be included in the Minutes of the Association.

BYLAW V - TRUSTEES

The legal title to all real and personal property of the Association shall be vested in the trustees and their successors in such office. The said trustees may convey said property by legal instruments pursuant to resolutions adopted and approved by the Association. They shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the said Association. See Article VII of the Constitution.

BYLAW VI - DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

SECTION 1. The Director of Missions shall be elected by the Association upon the recommendation of a special Director of Missions Search Committee. The Director of Missions Search Committee shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association or by the Executive Committee. The Director of Missions Search Committee shall be composed of seven (7) members who shall be representative of the churches in the Association both numerically and geographically. Upon his election, the Director of Missions shall become a member of all committees and organizations of the Association. The relationship between the Association and its Director of Missions may be terminated following a reasonable notice given by either party.

SECTION 2. The Director of Missions shall promote the work and witness of the Association and denomination, cooperating with the churches, their pastors and officers and Associational committees and organizations.

A. He shall be responsible for planning, promoting, and executing the ministry of the Association in cooperation with the Executive Committee and the Missions Development Council.

B. He shall make an annual report to the Association at the October meeting.

C. He shall be an ex officio member of all committees of the Association, serving in an advisory and/or resource capacity.

- D. He shall seek to visit each church in the Association in order to
 - (1) Enrich Christian fellowship among the churches.
 - (2) Encourage and strengthen the ministry of the churches.
 - (3) Enhance the cooperative relationship between the churches and the Association.

E. He shall, when necessary, conduct surveys or inquiries in order to determine specific needs for ministry within the area of the Association.

F. He shall, upon request, provide a list of qualified persons who may be considered by churches seeking pastors.

G. He shall have full administrative responsibility for all personnel employed by the Association.

SECTION 3.

A. The Director of Missions is entitled to two weeks vacation annually. Upon completion of five years service, the Director of Missions shall be entitled to three weeks annual vacation. Vacation is to be taken within the calendar year, and it is not accumulative. B. The Director of Missions is entitled to 30 days sick leave per calendar year, sick leave is not to be taken as vacation, and it is not accumulative.

C. The Director of Missions is entitled to four weeks per calendar year which he may use at his discretion for personal enrichment, professional development, and speaking engagements or revivals outside the Association. This time is not accumulative.


SECTION 4. Should there occur at any time a grievance on the part of the Association or the Director of Missions, either party may consult with the Moderator and Chairman of the Personnel Committees.

BYLAW VII - ANNUAL REPORTS

Persons who are to bring reports to the October meeting of the Association shall present the same to the Director of Missions or Clerk two weeks prior to the October meeting for these to be included in the Book of Reports.

BYLAW VII - AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the Bylaws may be made at any session of the October meeting of the Association when presented in writing and approved by a majority of the messengers present and voting.



Proceedings

of the

One Hundred Twenty First Annual Meeting

1. The 121st annual session of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association was called to order at 4:00 p.m. at Wilkesboro Baptist Church by Moderator James Gore.

2. The congregation joined in singing "Tell Me The Story of Jesus" led by Anna Marie Benge, Welcome Home Baptist Church, accompanied by Andrea Lyall at the piano.

3. Devotion and prayer was given by Rev. Ray Osborne, Roaring River Baptist Church.

4. Pastor AI Andrews welcomed the 254 messengers and visitors representing 38 churches.

5. Rev. Roy Dobyns, Minister of Youth and Education at Wilkesboro Baptist Church, spoke of their youth mission team's experience when they went to New Orleans. There is now a special bond between the youth and the inner city children. Mrs. Jennifer Harrold, adult chaperon, spoke of the mission trip. The youth have to train for several weeks before going on a mission trip - 12 youth went. They went the week of July 4th and toured the sights on the 4th. Their mission field was on North Robertson Avenue which is just a dirt lot. Monday started out well but ended badly - they went back to the Baptist Friendship House and received encouragement. Tuesday was better and each day improved - prayer was very important.

6. Rev. Ken Jones moved the adoption of the Order of Business with any necessary changes that may be needed. Seconded, adopted.

7. Moderator Gore requested that registration slips be passed in and asked everyone to stand and greet each other.

8. Moderator Gore introduced the new Director of Missions and wife, Rev. Lawson Horton and Carolyn.

BUSINESS SESSION

- A. Rev. Ken Jones gave the Evangelism Report (page 27 in the Book of Reports) and asked that everyone please read it. This was Ken's last year of service as Evangelism Director. In the Digest of Church Letters he noticed a statistic that alarms him - the total baptisms declined very substantially over last year. Rev. Jones stated that he is very excited about the association's involvement in missions.
- B. In the absence of Bob Seatz, Mrs. Pay Day gave the Finance Committee Report (page 18 in the BOR). The budget is made up from the requests of officers of the association. No questions were asked and the motion to adopt the report was seconded and carried. Mrs. Day read the following recommendation: In view of the fact that the Director of Missions was hired just two months prior to the associational fiscal year 1992-1993 it is difficult to evaluate and adjust salaries at this time; therefore, the Finance Committee recommends that the salary and benefits of the Director of Missions remain the same as in the 1991-1992 year and that a review be granted in six months.

first of April 1993, and that a recommendation be made at that time. The motion was seconded and carried.

- C. In the absence of Elizabeth Billings, Moderator Gore stated that the Membership Committee Report is on page 27 of the Book of Reports. Only one church has requested membership - Greater Vision Baptist Church, which will be under Watchcare for one year.
- D. Rev. Al Andrews gave the Ordination Committee Report (page 38 of the BOR).
- E. In the absence of Rev. Jimmy Hubbard, Moderator Gore stated that the Place and Preacher Committee Report was on page 26 of the BOR.
- F. Mr. Don Johnson gave the Properties Committee Report (page 28 in the BOR) and thanked the Brotherhood for all of the work they had done to the associational grounds and buildings.
- G. Rev. Lawson Horton called attention to the Calendar (pages 46-51 in the BOR) and stated that it contained associational, Baptist State Convention and Southern Baptist Convention dates.
- H. Mr. Jim Triplett gave the Dedication of Annuals Report. The committee recommends that the 1992 annual be dedicated to the Reverend Clyde Church.
- 1. Histories of Wilkesboro Baptist and Purlear Baptist Churches was given by Mr. George McNeil. Brushy Mountain Baptist Association first named a historian in the mid 1920's. Wilkesboro Baptist Church's history is on page 16 of the BOR and Purlear's is on page 12. Mr. McNeil stated that there were some churches that had never had a history published - so this year we are beginning something new by including two other church's histories. Shady Grove Baptist Church's history is on page 13 of the BOR and Elk's is on page 9. Mr. McNeil noticed from the UCL's that several churches have a history committee and urged the churches that did not have one to establish one. He also urged churches to make a permanent record including photographs and to arrange with Wake Forest University to have records microfilmed at no cost to the church. Mr. McNeil stated that the association's 125th anniversary would be in 1996 and that that would be a good time to write the association's history. An Associational History Committee would have four years to compile a history.
- J. The School of Christian Studies Committee Report was given by Rev. Edgar Whitlock (page 31 in the BOR). There have been seminary extension classes held at the prison and there is now a course on Matthew being taught every Thursday night at the associational office. There are 300 centers teaching seminary extension classes.
- K. Rev. Rick Felts gave the Nominating Committee Report. The committee consisted of: Steve Laws, Rev. Rick Felts, Mrs. Doris Watson, Mr. Curtis Greene, Rev. Al Andrews, Mr. Warner Miller and Mr. Mack Brock. He read the Officers and Representatives with corrections to two of them: Mrs. Anna Marie Benge replaces Martha Childs as Music Director and Rev. Arnold Gosnell will be Discipleship Training Director. Motion was seconded and carried. L. Kirk Walker, Liberty Grove Baptist Church, and Conley Call, First Baptist, were introduced to tell about their mission trip to New York. Mr. Walker told that they went to New York the weekend before Thanksgiving and took undergarments to Graffiti. He was really impressed with the fact that when they first got there, a recovering alcoholic shared his testimony with him. The experience of helping with the ministry of the Graffiti House has helped him as Brotherhood Director in his church.

Mr. Call said the Lord has blessed him very much and that it is thrilling how the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association people prayed for them - they were on mission for God. Mr. Call also went to New York the weekend before Christmas - "when a door opens, you'd better take advantage of it." Mr. Call stated that Doug Rollins is a tremendous planner but God took care of everything. "We had to be doing the will of the Lord." "We were the ones who received the blessing."

- M. The congregation joined in singing "Tell The Good News" led by Anna Marie Benge accompanied by Andrea Lyall at the piano.
- N. The Committee on Committees Report was given by Rev. Ted Miller. He stated that this one of the hardest committees to serve on. He stated that the association may want to consider making the Enrollment Committee a rotating committee instead of a new committee being elected each year. He read the names of the new committee members and made a motion. Seconded, carried.
- O. The Treasurer's Report was given by Mrs. Teresa H. Taylor.
- P. Mr. Pete Lovette gave the General Board Report (page 28 of the BOR). At the present trend of giving as of 9/22/92 the North Carolina Baptist Convention is experiencing a 1.69% increase in total Cooperative Program giving as compared to 1991 - \$19.6 million compared to \$19.3 million in 1991. The Baptist State Convention is \$21 million behind in budget. A budget of \$28.8 million is to be voted on November 11 at the Baptist State Convention. Total giving for Lottie Moon, Annie Armstrong, etc. was \$10.4 million; for Homes and Hospitals - \$910,000 (increase of 7.6%); and for State Missions - \$1.6 million. As of his last report, the churches of North Carolina had given \$420,000 for Hurricane Andrew relief. He urged everyone to read the proposal that would be published in the *Biblical Recorder* before going to the Baptist State Convention in November.
- Q. Miscellaneous business Moderator Gore introduced Pastor Mike Walker and members from Greater Vision Baptist Church.
- R. Director of Missions, Lawson Horton, stated that the Brazil Team members want to return one more time to Brazil but the Baptist State Convention of NC has ended the partnership. He read the following recommendation: I move you sir that the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association extend her partnership with the country of Brazil one more year and also enter a new three year partnership beginning in 1993 with the Ukraine in cooperation with our Baptist State Convention. Seconded. Rev. James Horton asked who would be the coordinator and if there would be any assistance. The coordinator will be Ken Jones and the Baptist State Convention will provide assistance. Motion carried.

DOM Horton stated that the association would like to have a booth at the fair October 13-18 with a different church being responsible for the booth each day and night. He also stated that there was some printed information on our New York Partnership on a table at the back for anyone who wanted to pick it up.

S. The Sunday School Report was given by Rev. Robert Duncan (page 31 in BOR). The ASSIST Team will come to any church and do a workshop. The team worked very hard on the VBS Clinic.

- T. DOM Horton gave the Discipleship Training Report (page 29 in the BOR). He has a keen interest in Discipleship Training - his goal is to have every church have a Discipleship Training Director.
- U. Mae Duncan gave the WMU Report (page 23 in the BOR) she stated that it had been a great year. Oak Grove Baptist Church started Baptist Women, Acteens, G.A.'s and Mission Friends. Pilgrim Baptist Church started Baptist Women, G.A.'s and Mission Friends. Greater Vision Baptist Church started Baptist Women and Mission Friends. Fishing Creek Baptist Church started Baptist Women. Edgewood Baptist Church started Acteens and G.A.'s. Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church is working toward starting a Baptist Young Women. She announced the pastor of the year -Rev. Ted Miller, pastor of Moravian Falls Baptist Church. She stated that they are excited about the new year and the theme this year is "Lead On".
- V. Doug Rollins gave the Brotherhood Report (page 24 in the BOR). He gave an update to the RA Jamboree - there were 180 participants with several commitments and recommitments. There were 13 people who went on the trip to Buffalo and they worked for a week (the team represented seven churches).

During the race ministry in April two people from Canada got saved and two people from Ohio who heard the message at that race got saved later.

There will be a return trip to Graffiti November 20 and December 18 (tentatively).

W. Moderator Gore recognized the visitors: Mrs. Mabel Couch, Church Growth Multiplier, Baptist State Convention of NC.

END OF BUSINESS SESSION

9. Mrs. Leslie Speas, Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church, brought the special music. She sang "With All My Heart."

10. Director of Missions, Lawson Horton, brought the afternoon message. The scripture was John 14:25-31 - the commission "Go and Make Disciples" has come to individuals and churches. We are living in troubled times. The Disciples were also involved in troubled times but Jesus gave them assurance of conquest. Every day is a new day - He will be present with us and teach us. He gives us peace - we are able to be conquers because He gives us peace. Genesis 19:17 - we are on mission for Jesus Christ in this place.

11. DOM Horton gave the benediction and blessing of the meal and the meeting was recessed for the evening meal.

12. The meeting was reconvened at 7:00 p.m. with Moderator James Gore presiding.

13. The congregation joined in singing "Tell Me The Story of Jesus" led by Anna Marie Benge accompanied by Retta Absher at the organ.

14. Rev. Arnold Gosnell, Minister of Education and Youth at Millers Creek Baptist Church, read scripture from I John 4:7 and led in prayer.

15. Pastor Al Andrews welcomed everyone.

16. Jennifer Minton, Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church, was introduced to tell about the mission trip to Alexandria, Virginia. She developed an interest in missions at a young age. On her first mission trip she led a little boy, Oliver, to the Lord. This was her second trip to Alexandria - they conducted missions in a housing project. The children in the projects do not have much. They had 50 children. She read scripture from Philippians 3:7-8 "Everything we do is going to pass away except what we do for the Lord." Leaving the children was hard but she felt a peace because they had presented Christ to the children. They held a Backyard Bible Club here in Wilkes County at the Riverview Apartments and also held an adult class for the parents. The mothers wanted to start their own Sunday School. Miss Minton ended her talk by reading Psalm 48.

17. Vice-Moderator Speas introduced the new pastors and their wives: Rev. Billy Felts and JoAnna (Goshen Baptist), Rev. Mike Walker and Debbie (Greater Vision), Rev. Arnold Gosnell and Sandi (Minister of Education and Youth at Millers Creek Baptist), and Rev. Ray Osborne and Stephanie (Roaring River Baptist).

18. Moderator Gore introduced Ken Jones to give the Brazil Partnership Report. Rev. Jones read a letter from a family in Brazil. He is encouraged to see the results of the team's visits. On page 22 of the Book of Reports is a report on Brazil written by Jim Gore. The 1992 team consisted of eleven people from our association approximately 2,000 people made decisions. The Brazilians are very receptive, not only to Baptists, but also to false doctrines. This is why Rev. Jones is so keen on continuing our partnership another year. The churches of the association raised \$5,000 last year and bought and used part of it to buy a piece of property that is now having a church built on it. \$1,500 was used to construct a church and is now being used. Rev. Jones stated that he preached eight times in one day - the Lord gives you extra energy to do the work that needs to be done. He saw 600 people saved in one day from 15 years old to 25 years old. They were allowed to go into the schools this time. As soon as the date is confirmed for the 1993 Mission Team trip, word will go out to the churches.

Rev. Jones was asked by two young girls from First Baptist, Franca to go and share the Gospel with their parents. He went with the girls to their home and the mother opened her Bible to the flyleaf where Rev. Jones had signed it when he gave it to the mother's father who had sense passed away. Both of the girl's parents were saved that night. "A soul is a soul, is a soul, is a soul." Rev. Jones finished preaching on Saturday night about 9:30 p.m. and was asked to come to a Presbyterian church at 10:00 p.m. to conduct a soul-winning class for the youth. There were about 100 youth in attendance and one soul was saved during the class.

The team made a commitment to help a new congregation (financially) to bu a piece of land and also to buy a piece of land for a pastorium. Rev. Jones brought a check for \$500 from Welcome Home Baptist Church to start the offering. A special offering was taken for this project after Rev. Jones led in prayer.

19. Special music for the offering was presented by Mrs. Anna Marie Benge, Welcome Home Baptist Church, who sang "To Love The Lord Our God Is The Heartbeat of Our Mission."

20. The congregation joined in singing "Jesus Is All The World To Me" led by Mrs. Anna Marie Benge accompanied by Ms. Retta Absher at the organ.

21. Mr. Alan Kilby, Oak Grove Baptist Church, was introduced to tell about his trip to Miami to work on the Baptist Men's Disaster Relief Van. The Lord brought 25 strangers together to cook meals for 6,500 people each day. They ran out of New Testaments before another shipment arrived. They cooked meals and put temporary roofs on. The people were very appreciative and he's proud to be one that went. "If you are not involved, get involved."

22. Moderator Gore announced that the amount of the offering for Brazil was \$1.476.46.

23. Moderator Gore introduced Mr. R.G. Puckett from the Biblical Recorder to speak. He talked about the article about Miss North Carolina and what a dedicated Christian she is. He told about when Hurricane Andrew was about to strike, the Baptist Men Disaster Relief Van was headed to Florida and was serving meals that night. The Baptist State Convention sent fifteen truck loads of building materials and five truck loads of food. In thirty-nine days, North Carolina Baptists give \$521,196 for hurricane relief. Mr. Puckett stated that the Recorder does not present news with endorsement or disendorsement, they just present it. Mr. Puckett that Dr. Keith Parks speech will be published in two weeks - Dr. Parks said we have to get past the ninety second news bite that supposedly informs us. "We live in a very difficult, conflicting age - every generation is just one step away from paganism." The Biblical Recorder will celebrate its 160th anniversary in three months.

24. Joe Lennon from the Christian Action League was introduced to speak. He thanked everyone for their support. He stated that we suffer from "The Sin of Silence" - we have sat back and let the pagans take over. We need to be more assertive. He read scripture from Psalm 9:17 and Psalm 33. (1) Lottery Bill - 10th vear that the gambling industry has tried to legalize the lottery and gambling gambling is getting someone elses money. (2) Parental Consent Bill on Abortion - one senator (Sam Johnson) sat on that bill for two years - we need to work on this. (3) Sex Education in School Bill - emphasizes abstinence before marriage. Can't even get the bill out of committee - it's time for us to rise up against this. (4) Liquor by the Drink - all have been defeated so far this year.

25. Moderator Gore introduced Mr. Mack Roberts, president of Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute, to speak. He stated that he had been a Christian for almost 41 years and have been a Baptist all those years. The Christian world is where it's happening. He is excited about all of the new students that will be arriving at Fruitland on Tuesday morning - they range in age from 19 to 52 years old. They are there because God called them. Fruitland has graduated approximately 2,000 pastors. Fruitland was started to train individuals who could not go to seminary. Part of our Cooperative Program dollars go to keep Fruitland open. They have just completed three new student apartments and purchased five acres of land to expand. "Remember, Fruitland belongs to you!"

26. Steve Call was introduced to report on Welcome Home Baptist Church Youth Mission trip - they went to Myrtle Beach, SC. The Lord saved forty-one people. Four youth gave their testimonies about the trip: Candi Johnson, Crystal Bumgarner, Nicki Church and Misty Miller. Their theme for the trip was "Light Your World.

27. Special music was presented by the Welcome Home Baptist Church Youth

Choir who sang "To God Alone Be The Glory." 28. Moderator Gore brought a short message (yielding the rest of his time to the volunteers who went to New York). "What is the greatest need of our churches?" "Possibly it is for the people on our church roles to reclaim sharing the Gospel." Our baptisms and church membership are down while offerings are up. He fears we would employ people to do the work of ministry and be satisfied to let the "paid" people do the ministry. He encouraged everyone in the church to make a fresh commitment to be about the business of reaching people for God. Urged church leaders to evaluate their own situation and see if this isn't one of the greatest needs in their church. He expressed his appreciation for being allowed to serve as Moderator for two years.

29. David Childers, Millers Creek Baptist Church, was introduced to tell about his mission trip to Graffiti House, New York City. He stated that he has been the Brotherhood Director at Millers Creek for a little over a year. Six men from Millers Creek Church, three from other churches went to do a lot of work at Graffiti. Millers Creek Church has fifteen men and women going to Miami in November to help the victims of Hurricane Andrew. David stated that the people of New York have the same needs that we have here. He helped serve the free lunch in the park (FLIP), his job was to pass out the candy. This trip was the first time David had witnessed and it has helped him since he got back to Wilkes County to be a witness. David stated that Ken Jones and Mark Combs led a young man, Max, to Christ. He asked that everyone remember them in prayer as they go to Miami. He read the hymn "Make Me A Blessing."

30. Penny Whittington, Oakwoods Baptist Church, was introduced to tell about her participation in a mission trip to Buffalo, New York. After she felt the call to go, everything fell into place. It was a hard trip - long hours and VBS with children two evenings, but was very rewarding.

31. Dr. John Wayland gave the benediction and the meeting adjourned at 9:15 p.m.

SECOND DAY

Pre-session music was presented by the New Life Singers.

32. The second day of the 121st Annual Meeting was called to order by Vice-Moderator Rick Speas at 7:00 p.m. on October 6, 1992 at Purlear Baptist Church.

33. The congregation joined in singing "Tell Me The Story of Jesus" led by Anna Marie Benge accompanied by Denise Eller at the piano.

34. Rev. Billy Felts, Goshen Baptist Church, read scripture from Acts 17:23 and led in prayer.

35. Pastor Hadley Triplett welcomed the 182 messengers and visitors representing 35 churches.

36. Vice-Moderator Speas introduced Doug Kerley and Don Johnson to report on their trip to New York. Mr. Johnson read scripture from John 4:35 and stated that going to New York has opened his eyes to the needs of Wilkes County. C his first trip to New York seven men met at Wilkesboro Baptist Church and had prayer before leaving - during that prayer time Mr. Johnson knew he was in the will of God. He met a mentally retarded teenage girl and her mom who live in an abandoned building - he became very close to the girl. Pastor Taylor Fields has a small church there to minister to the needs of the homeless and needy. During the renovation the mission team was conducting, God worked one miracle after another. They completely remodeled two bathrooms. Mr. Johnson went forty-two hours without sleep. He helped serve a meal to the homeless on Saturday. He now has a prayer partner in New York who is also a grandparent.

Doug Kerley told of his experience - "When God tells you to go, He goes along with you." He told about the power of prayer, what God can do if you make yourself available and the power God has over Satan. God provided all the things they needed. He met missionaries that are supported through the Cooperative Program. On Sunday morning, the mission team sang and Doug Rollins gave his testimony. Doug's job was to hand out gloves and he met a dear Japanese mother with two young children. Doug thanked Doug Rollins who has given much of his time and money for these trips. He also thanked Doug's wife and the association for their support. "We are all called to serve."

37. The Hinshaw Street Baptist Church Mission Team was represented by Mr. Tad Gambill who spoke of their mission trip to Nada, Kentucky. For eleven years a pastor in Nada prayed for someone to come and tell the children about Jesus. In 1989 Martha Colwell called the Home Mission Board for a mission need - which was Nada. A team of women from Hinshaw Street Baptist Church went that year and a team has gone every summer for four years. A church in Winchester donated \$38,000 in materials and the Hinshaw Street Mission Team helped with the construction - God provided several miracles during that time. ''The people at Nada need your prayers.''

38. Special music was presented by the New Life Singers.

39. The congregation joined in singing the Praise Chorus led by Anna Marie Benge accompanied by Denise Eller at the piano.

40. Rev. Earl Adams, Pilgrim Baptist Church, was introduced to tell about his mission trip to West Virginia - "God sent me to West Virginia." When he found out about the partnership between North Carolina and West Virginia to double the number of Southern Baptist churches in West Virginia, he decided he wanted to go. His first trip was with Dr. Bill McKinney. They conducted Backyard Bible Clubs and had seven conversions that week. He has since gone on several mission trips to West Virginia. He didn't go for three years but went back in 1989 for two months in Oak Hill, West Virginia - he has gone back to Oak Hill every year since. Earl stated that he became very discouraged in the spring of 1992, but that God started working and seven team members went Oak Hill. He thanked all of the churches for all of the VBS materials they donated. "God took care of all of their expenses." He thanked everyone that had went over the years.

Gus Kerhoulas, Pilgrim Baptist Church, told of his experience in going to Oak Hill, West Virginia. "The Lord let him retire in time to go with Earl to West Virginia." "I was there to do God's work, not mine."

39. Liberty Grove Baptist Church's Mission Team went to Carolina Beach led by Pastor Sam Childs. Twelve members went and each member spoke briefly of their experience. They conducted Backyard bible Clubs in the mornings and had recreation with the people in the afternoons. In the evenings they presented puppet shows, singing, and witnessed at Jubilee Park. They went to a Senior Citizens Home and presented puppet shows and went to the First Baptist Church to sing. The youth chose this mission trip over a trip to Caswell. Each youth that went was required to attend training workshops and stated that prayer support from home was very important to them.

41. Rev. Ken Jones was introduced to bring the evening message. He read scripture from Matthew 28:18-20 - ''The Great Commission.'' Rev. Robert Duncan led in prayer. Rev. Jones stated ''Is a fisherman really a fisherman if he never catches any fish?'' Four years ago this very night Rev. Jones life was changed by a message brought by Dr. Bill McKinney. Rev. Jones was raised in a Southern Baptist home, attended seminary, pastored churches, but until four years ago missions was not top priority. Dr. McKinney spoke on the need for all to be directly involved in missions. Rev. Jones was challenged by Foreign Mission Board Boyd O'Neil to go on a mission trip. A team from Welcome Home Baptist Church went to Jamaica and Rev. Jones has gone to Brazil for four years and plans to go again. "A message of hope" - the Great Commission compels us to go and do missions. It is an imperative command that we cannot neglect. The concept is that we have to go elsewhere to do missions - not so - we are to go wherever there is a lost person. "We're doing a better job over there than we are here." "We are to be on mission everyday as we go." He read scripture from Acts 1:8 - tell others how *you* were saved. "Sometimes we get too busy doing church business that we don't do the business of the church." He urged us to start at home, our Jerusalem. "It's time that we let the church be the church." "We've got to do what the Lord wants us to do." He closed his message with a prayer of commitment.

- B. Rev. Lawson Horton came to give the Director of Missions Report. He stated what a joy it is in his heart to be here in this association and among these people. He stated that we have an opportunity to get involved in a ministry at the fair if you can help, we would welcome your help. He announced that a truck would be at Wilkesboro Baptist Church from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. on October 11 for Wilkes Cares for World Hunger. He thanked Moderator Gore and Vice-Moderator Speas for their involvement in the associational meeting.
- C. Rev. Sam Childs gave the Resolutions Committee Report as follows: Whereas, Wilkesboro Baptist Church and Purlear Baptist Church so graciously shared their facilities with those gathered for the 121st Brushy Mountain Baptist Association Annual Meeting be it resolved that the association express our grateful appreciation to these churches. Also, we express appreciation to our Moderator, and others who have helped make this a successful annual meeting. D. Rev. Hadley Triplett gave the Memorials Committee Report. There was a total of 91 deaths. Rev. Triplett had a moment of remembrance in silent prayer and then led in prayer.

42. Vice-Moderator Speas praised Jim Gore especially for the time he filled in while the association was without a Director of Missions.

43. The congregation joined in singing the Doxology led by Anna Marie Benge accompanied by Denise Eller at the piano and the meeting adjourned at 9:10 p.m.



But folks, I am excited to report that at the Sunday Morning service in April we had *two people* who came and made public professions of faith in Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord. That makes it all worthwhile.

NEW YORK MINISTRIES

The Undergarment Ministry to Graffiti House in New York City was a tremendous success last November at Thanksgiving. We took approximately 7,000 pairs of gloves that were given to people throughout the neighborhood. Pastor Taylor said that you could see the gloves in different areas of New York City as the homeless and others move to find the essentials of life. We delivered approximately 200 pair of thermals, 700 pair of socks and 300-400 tee shirts and undershorts. The folks there were so appreciative of these much needed gifts of new undergarments. Kirk Walker and Tim Pierce, Liberty Grove Baptist Church, Conley Call from First Baptist, North Wilkesboro and myself went to give out the undergarments. While at Graffiti we discovered a need to which we needed to respond. In wintertime in New York City, blankets become a valuable item to those on the streets and even for many who have apartments but can't afford to have the heat turned on. The folks of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association gave generously so we could buy blankets for those in New York City. Conley Call, First Baptist, Lee Roy Church, Welcome Home Baptist Church and myself delivered the blankets three days before Christmas. We passed out approximately 250 blankets on Saturday during "Free Lunch in the Park", which is a ministry to the homeless and needy. All of you that gave to purchase blankets for this ministry are to be commended for your generosity, and your loving, caring attitude toward those in need. Jesus said, "If you have done it to one of the least of these my brothers, you have done it unto me." For many, blankets were the best Christmas present they could receive and for many it was the only present they received. It was a very special Christmas for those who went and for you that made it possible and for those who staved warm last winter.

We made two subsequent trips to Graffiti with work teams. Some of the projects we completed were: (1) remodeled bathroom for East 7th Baptist Church (before, they had to climb four flights of stairs to use a bathroom); (2) remodeled bathrooms for Home Missionaries at Graffiti; (3) replaced floor covering in kitchen where meals are prepared for Graffiti; (4) made drawers and shelves to provide additional storage space; (5) built loft bed to give more usable floor space; (6) lowered ceiling to help reduce heating cost; (7) put sealer on brick wall; (8) painted interior; (9) repaired and painted front of Graffiti; (10) patched up roof where leaking; (11) stopped leaks in plumbing; (12) installed track lights in office; (13) handed out Bibles and other literature; (14) best for last - one of our team members led a young man to Christ on the street. The young man was present at worship service the next morning and came during the invitation to give his life to the Lord. Praise God for what he is doing through the ministry of Graffiti in New York!

The_following men participated by going on these trips to New York: Conley Call, First Baptist Church (first and second trips); Kirk Walker and Tim Pierce, Liberty Grove Baptist Church; Roy Church, Don Johnson (third and fourth trips) and Jerry Staley, Welcome Home Baptist Church; Doug Kerley and Minter Cleary, Hinshaw Street Baptist Church; Ernest Walsh, Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church; Dennis Francis, Pleasant Home Baptist Church; Joe Hartzog, Steve Harris, Will Hartley, David Childers, Mark Combs and Bobby Faw, Millers Creek Baptist Church.

I would also like to thank the churches that supported us this year with your gifts and with your prayers. It is exciting to see what God can and will do when we make ourselves available to His will. We have a trip to Buffalo, New York sched-

uled for September 12 and hope to report to you at our annual meeting.

It is our intention again this year to take undergarments, thermals, socks, etc. to Graffiti and then also to take blankets around December. Your support is greatly appreciated.

Again, I thank you for making these mission efforts successful. God has used you in a mighty way to minister to others. Thank you.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

Like a marathon runner, Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina (BCH) "hit the wall" in 1991-92, but persevered to finish standing up!

In an exhausting year for staff and a myriad of volunteers, BCH successfully concluded its first statewide fund-raising campaign, received its first Thanksgiving Offering since 1979, dedicated expansion of Cameron Boys Camp, broke ground for the new Fleshman-Pratt Education Center in Thomasville, inaugurated an innovative Bible study program at Mills Home, installed two new pastors at campus churches and solidified programs that have placed it among child care leader for decades.

These efforts enabled BCH to serve more than 1,300 children and families at 13 facilities statewide, including Chris, named All-Conference nose guard for 2A state champion Thomasville Bulldogs; Sandi, who enrolled at Gardner-Webb College; Deborah, named outstanding Freshman at Thomasville High after enduring a court battle that sent her father to prison for abuse; Jennifer, who married on the Broyhill campus where she'd lived for seven years; Kathy, who will continue to live at Broyhill while she attends college; and a host of others who are making life-changing commitments because they've received a second chance at Baptist Children's Homes.

In April, BCH successfully concluded its "Give a child a chance!" financial campaign by gaining three-year commitments for \$11.2 million, topping the \$7.5 million goal, and the challenge goal of \$11 million. Significant priorities accomplished in the campaign are: expansion and relocation of Cameron Boys Camp to a more secluded site on its 903-acres of wilderness; ground-breaking for the Fleshman-Pratt Education Center, a model day care facility for infants, toddlers and twoyear-olds; a unique Staff Training Institute for child care workers and social workers; and more than \$2.7 million committed for permanent endowment.

And, the first Thanksgiving Offering for BCH since 1979 raised \$510,000, a sum more than \$100,000 greater than that realized through the combined offering with Baptist Hospital and Baptist Retirement Homes. BCH sent \$1,000 from the Thanksgiving Offering to the Baptist Children's Homes of Sao Paulo, Brazil as fulfillment of a promise to donate 10 percent of everything received over the goal to our partners in the South.

In addition, BCH maintained the partnership with our Brazilian counterparts by sending three training teams to Brazil, and hosting a group of Brazilian pastors in Thomasville.

Most BCH residents come from dysfunctional families where a single parent, most often a mother, is unable to care for her children. Her frustration with life,

often due to alcohol or drug abuse, or having been abused herself, leads to limitless freedom for the children, which leads to troubling behavior. Physical abuse, divorce, alcohol, drugs and truancy mark their young lives. Behavioral problems make it impossible for the child to continue to live at home.

Baptist Children's Homes provides a safe environment where children learn to name their problems and set goals to overcome them, which leads to behavior change and often. At the same time, willing family members also are addressing their problems with the help of BCH social workers. In many cases, children and families are restored.

BCH enjoyed a year of tremendous successes, in human terms and in institutional terms, which will allow it to continue to affect change in lives. Success in the "Give a child a chance!" Campaign will help provide a margin of excellence in the future when the pledges are paid. Already, the enthusiasm engendered by the effort have lifted the spirits of staff across the state.

Still, the Cooperative Program continues to anchor our budget planning. We urged renewed commitment to cooperative giving among our churches. It is essential, not only for us, but for the entire missions enterprise built painstakingly for a century and a half. Baptist Children's Homes receives \$1.5 million from Cooperative Program receipts each year. This is the stockpile around which we build our other income planning. A decrease in Cooperative Program dollars to Baptist Children's Homes would seriously jeopardize our ability to care for children.

An increasingly important aspect of our support comes from estate gifts and bequests. More and more people who want their resources to provide new life for children include BCH in their wills.

When Sandi, and Kathy, and Chris, and Barbara come to us, full of potential and hope, we want to be able to continue to tell them North Carolina Baptists care enough to give them a chance!

HOME MISSION BOARD REPORT

The Home Mission Board reports a record number of missionary personnel this past year. An all time high of 4,922 was reached. The Home Mission Board is on target toward their goal of 5,000 missionaries by A.D. 2000.

Crossover Atlanta was a great blessing. During this evangelistic event, Baptist in Atlanta for the Southern Baptist Convention shared the gospel with 1,112 people and 183 made professions of faith.

The Home Mission Board Research Division estimated 1991 baptisms at 390,800. This was an increase of 1.5% over 1990. The Board reported that 464 churches were started in primary Anglo communities.

The Annie Armstrong Easter Offering provided \$35,522,891.96 for evangelism, church starting, church growth, and ministry work.

Let us all continue to pray for Dr. Larry Lewis, President of the Home Mission Board, and for the Missionaries of the Home Mission Board.

It will be up to them to contact that regional team captain and make sure that the date they have in mind is good for the team captain and his driver. GENERAL BOARD REPORT

In January, 1990, I began a four year team as a General Board member of the N. C. Baptist Convention and have attended two meetings of the board this year, one in January and again in May. My responsibilities include serving as a member of the Business Management Committee which is chaired by Mr. Glendel

Stephenson. The next General Board meeting is scheduled for September of this year. There are ten committees that handle various areas of responsibilities of the General Board. The General Board conducts the business of the statewide convention in all matters except those specifically exempted by the Constitution. One of the responsibilities of the convention is to serve as a conduit for receiving Cooperative Program missions gifts from many churches in our convention and channeling it to the various mission programs.

In North Carolina, overall giving (as shown in the table below) to the Cooperative Program is about even with the same period one year ago (up less than 1%). The economic recession and the many distracting issues that continue to face Baptists in North Carolina and the Southern Baptist Convention have adversely affected growth trend in Cooperative Program giving.

As follows is a brief summary of selected items from the financial statements of the Baptist State Convention that shows the trend of giving by our North Carolina churches through 8-15-92:

CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE OF NC REPORT

For the 10th consecutive year, the gambling industry has not been able to secure passage of any gambling legislation such as a lottery or pari-mutual betting (horse and dog racing).

The industry made its biggest push ever during the 1991-1992 legislative session. They secured 14 of the most effective and best known lobbyists that money can buy to push for their cause, but to no avail. When the legislature adjourned on July 24th, the gambling industry threw in the towel realizing that they did not have the votes in the N. C. House to pass their state-sponsored gambling bill, the lottery.

What made the difference? People like you did. You secured the commitments from your legislators that the role of government is not to exploit their weakest

citizens, but to appeal to their strengths. Gambling violates that age-old principle.

There is one thing for sure. The pro-gambling forces will be back. However, the issue will be decided on November 3rd at the General Election. If you elect legislators who are opposed to state-sponsored gambling, it will not make any difference how many lobbyists the gambling industry employs. The decision is your hands. How do the candidates from your area stand on this issue?

There are other very important moral issues that you need to discuss with your legislative candidates. Some of them are:

- 1. SEX EDUCATION... Are our young people being deceived into believing that "safe sex" outside of marriage is possible and okay? The current rise in venereal diseases and teenage pregnancies, and the related emotional problems tells us we must focus attention on this issue.
- 2. ABORTION....The Supreme Court ruling regarding the abortion law of the state of Pennsylvania opens the door for further restrictions and conditions under which abortions can be performed — leaving this up to the states. This year we have worked on trying to get legislation passed requiring parental consent for abortion on minors, and reducing abortion funding. Both of these measures passed in the House but died in the Senate.
- 3. ALCOHOL/DRUG ISSUES...It is so important that we continue to address problems related to alcohol use and abuse. Reducing the blood alcohol standard for DWI from .10 to .08 was one of our targets this year, but it also failed to pass in the Senate after passing in the House.

We cannot over emphasize the importance of getting to know who your candidates are and how they stand on these key issues. Plato put it so well: "The price that good people pay for not being involved in politics is to be governed by people worse than themselves."

Thank you for standing with us in the cause of applied Christianity.

YOUTH REPORT

Respectfully submitted, Roy Dobyns, Jr. Baptist Hospital utilizes the skills and training of more than 5,700 employees to provide outstanding health care in settings as varied as the Brenner Children's Hospital, the Trauma Center, and the J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging and Rehabilitation. Last year, the Joint Committee on the Accreditation of Health Care Organizations said that Baptist Hospital ranks in the top 10 percent of all hospitals in the nation.

During the past year, the hospital admitted 24,000 patients. It performed 16,662 surgical procedures, including 1,020 open heart operations, 29 kidney transplants and 80 bone marrow transplants. The AirCare helicopter flew 742 missions.

Total revenue of the hospital during the year was \$407,280,000. Cooperative Program gifts from the churches were \$656,180, which was applied to the budget of the Department of Pastoral Care. The Mother's Day Offering and other special gifts from the churches totaled \$424,406 and was used for benevolent care for patients who had no other means of paying their hospital bills.

The Pastoral Care Department, which is funded in part through the Cooperative Program, provided clinical pastoral education to 55 students during the past year. The Pastoral Care staff provided more than 53,000 specific ministries to hospital patients, family members, and staff. And, the counseling division provided over 24,000 counseling sessions. The professional staff of the Pastoral Care Department continues to respond to requests for help from churches in conflict, from pastors and their families across the state.

The various services of the hospital are readily accessible to all North Carolina Baptists and others. A telephone call to the Health-On Call Office (919-716-2255) can secure an outpatient appointment with any one of the various specialists on the staff or can begin the process of gaining admission to the hospital if that need is indicated.

Charges for the hospital services compare very favorably with those in other hospitals of the state. Reports from the North Carolina Medical Database Commission indicate that Baptist Hospital's charge are lower than the average in other hospitals which provide similar services and are considerably lower than in the other teaching hospitals. Our hospital did not have an increase in its rates for the current fiscal year of July 1, 1992 - June 30, 1993.

The hospital's physical plant continues to expand. A new 840-space parking deck was opened in January. A new Emergency Department/Dietary building which will also make possible more private patient rooms is under construction now. Construction will begin soon on the 170-bed skilled and intermediate care nursing facility and on the J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging and Rehabilitation. This expansion will make it possible not only to serve more people, but to serve them better.

The staff and the patients of Baptist Hospital are grateful to North Carolina Baptists for the heritage they have given to institution and for the moral and financial support they continue to give to its ministry.

NC BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, as an agency of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, is committed under the guidance of the Holy Spirit in serving North Carolina Baptists and others in generating an increased awareness of Christian estate stewardship principals as a means of financially undergirding churches, institutions and mission endeavors on a permanent basis.

Assets are managed under the direction of the Foundation Board of Directors with interest income being paid either in perpetuity to Baptist causes named by the donor or to the donor (or heirs) for their lifetime (or specific period of time) before the income is then paid in perpetuity to the named Baptist causes.

During 1991, the Board of Directors, with the assistance of a nationally recognized investment consulting firm, adopted a detailed Investment Policy to govern the types of investments that its fiscal agents may make in keeping with the Christian commitment of the Foundation, as well as attempt to insure that the future spending value of the invested trust fund dollar will keep up with inflation. A study revealed that during the past five years the fiscal agents managing the Foundation assets ranked near the top nationally with other investment managers who operate under investment guidelines similar to the ones provided by the Foundation Board.

The Foundation staff and operations are housed in a building adjacent to the Baptist State Convention Building in Cary. Individuals and church groups are invited to call and arrange a visit of their Trust Agency's office building.

The significance of the Foundation services was illustrated in a recent experience that staff members had while eating in a fast food restaurant in Durham. In taking a seat adjacent to a table occupied by a young black police officer, we observed the enthusiasm of a white lad of about 4 years of age as he stood talking to the officer. As the mother and a younger child, coming from another area of the restaurant, called for the lad to join them, he walked away from the table 6 to 8 feet, turned around and said to the officer, who was now standing and preparing to leave, "Can I give you a hug?" After an affirmative answer from the officer, the child walked over to the officer, reached around his legs and gave him a hug. The officer confirmed to us that he wished the world was filled with people like this child. The example corresponds to what so many already have done through the Foundation. As they approach the time of leaving this earthly life, they look back affectionately on what the Lord has done for them during their life and decide

that they want to leave an expression of their love through an enduring and lasting gift (a "hug," if you please) that will serve the Lord until His return.

BAPTIST RETIREMENT HOMES REPORT 1992: MAKING LIFE FOR OLDER ADULTS THE BEST OF TIMES

One of the greatest needs facing North Carolina Baptists as they move into 1993 is the ability to provide affordable quality long-term care services to the "Aged Saints" of our Convention.

The fastest growing segment of North Carolina Baptist life are those individuals in the age category of 85 and older. That age group is growing at five times the rate of any other population segment in Baptist life. The 85 and older age group is also that age group most likely to need the services provided by a long-term care institution like Baptist Retirement Homes. Unfortunately in 1992 in our State, there were not enough nursing care beds to meet the needs of the growing number of Older Adults who were functionally impaired and needed the services of a long-term care provider. Complicating the shortage problem was the fact that the cost of those beds was high (more than the average North Carolina Baptist Older Adult could pay). And to make matters even worse, in spite of the high cost of those beds, often the quality of care provided through those beds was fair at best. In other words, the greatest problem facing North Carolina Baptist Older Adults in 1992 was the fact that there were simply not enough affordable quality nursing care beds available for use by people like you and me and our Older Adult family members.

Having become aware some years ago of the above mentioned problem, Baptist Retirement Homes (for the last five year period) has been working to develop a system of affordable quality nursing care beds throughout the State for use by North Carolina Baptist Older Adults. New nursing care beds became available in the Piedmont area of our State in 1989 (through the opening of the Brookridge Retirement Community). In 1992, affordable quality nursing care will become available to Western North Carolina Baptist Older Adults through the new Rickman Nursing Care Center being built on Richmond Hill in Northwest Asheville. It is our institution's hope that by 1994 affordable quality nursing care will also be available to Eastern North Carolina Baptist Older Adults as well. Your support has made the above possible.

In 1992, North Carolina Baptists through their gifts to the Cooperative Program and North Carolina Offering for Older Adults made it possible for Baptist Retirement Homes to provide financial assistance to more than 60% of all the Older Adults living in its health care related facilities. In addition, Western North Carolina Baptists contributed more than \$2.5 million toward the construction of the new Rickman Nursing Care Center in Asheville...a new facility that will enable Baptist Retirement Homes to make life for many Western North Carolina Baptists truly...the Best of Times. Thank you North Carolina Baptists for your support. Please continue to pray for our ministry and its ability to meet the ever growing needs of the Older Adults of our Convention.



Update to HISTORY OF LITTLE ROCK BAPTIST CHURCH

The 1982 Annual of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association contains the history of Little Rock Baptist Church through that year. Events prior to that date will not be included in this report. I want to thank Mrs. Eula C. Little, Church Clerk, for assisting in the preparation of this update. A review of the historical highlights indicates emphasis in

A review of the historical highlights indicates emphasis in four areas: training, equipping and reviving of its leaders and members; providing facilities and a functional organizational format; providing enrichment opportunities for its members; and promoting and participating in missions activities.

In the spring of 1983, Little Rock participated in the countywide World Missions Revival. Later that year, members involved themselves in a Sunday School Enrollment/Enlargement training program. The church participated in Southern Baptist simultaneous revivals in 1986, 1989 and 1990. Arrangements were made to enable the youth of the church to attend Ridgecrest in 1985. Children and youth Bible drills were encouraged, and in 1991, five children were state finalists. The same year, a youth also advanced to state level participation in Bible drills. The church has made it possible for the pastor to attend most of the annual meetings of the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Facilities and organizational format have been improved and modified to meet current needs. A special fund to purchase a church van was started in 1983, and the van became a reality in 1987. The exterior of the church, the educational building, the parsonage and the picnic shelter have been painted and repaired to maintain an attractive appearance. The interior of the parsonage was redecorated and the kitchen modernized. In 1989, an anonymous donor provided new choir seating. The pews in the sanctuary were upholstered in 1992. A computer was purchased in 1991, and a new copier and folding machine in 1993. The church constitution and by-laws were carefully reviewed and revised in 1991-92. The revised version was printed in booklet form and distributed to each member.

In 1984, on the hilltop adjacent to the east side of the cemetery, the Broyhill family broke ground for the Broyhill Memorial Gardens. This beautifully landscaped garden, with flowing water accents, was dedicated on June 30, 1985. At that time, Paul H. Broyhill presented to the church deeds to three areas of land the gardens, the area between the church driveway and the cemetery, and the land directly in front of the church extending to Highway NC18. This made it possible, in 1991, for the North Carolina Department of Transportation to relocate the church entrance road, improving accessibility and enhancing the appearance of the grounds. That same year, the church adopted rules applicable to the cemetery. Little Rock published its first church directory in 1986. Two years later, a day was set aside for celebration of Church Heritage Day. During each of the past several years, WMU has sponsored a "CareFair" or health fair. Mrs. Kate Livingston was honored, on September 13, 1992, for her many years of faithful and devoted service to the church.

Pastor Fuller and his wife travelled to Brazil in April 1991 as members of a witnessing team cooperating with the Brazil Partnership. Pastor Fuller returned to Brazil in 1992 on another mission trip. Little Rock generously contributed to the fund to help build a church in Brazil. With the Brazil Partnership ended, and the arrangement of the partnership between Baptists in North Carolina and New York, Little Rock is presently involved in a mission project of helping to restore a 100-year old building in Buffalo, NY for a small Baptist congregation there.

The following pastors have served Little Rock since 1982: Rev. Elliott Hayes (1981-1985); Rev. E. W. McMurray, interim (1985); Rev. Sam H. Childs (1986-1989); Rev. Charlie Pool, interim (1989); and Rev. Jerry W. Fuller (1990-present). Deacons who were ordained during this period include Wayne Little, Everette Griffin, Larry Anderson and Willard Greene. Thomas Sanderson served as a deacon during part of the period, having been received by transfer of letter.

Little Rock is located in rural surroundings in Boomer Township, in extreme southwestern Wilkes County. During the period covered by this report, total church membership has declined 4% from 280 in 1982 to 268 in 1992 - while Sunday School enrollment has remained unchanged at 147. Average Sunday School attendance has declined almost 14%, from 111 to 96. The value of church property is presently estimated to be \$350,000.

Update to MT. PLEASANT BAPTIST CHURCH HISTORY

The Brushy Mountain Baptist Association Annual for 1985 contains an update to the history of Mount Pleasant Baptist Church through that date. Events occurring prior to 1985 will not be included in this report. I want to thank Mrs. Kate Eller, Church Clerk, and Mrs. Eloise Church for gathering the facts on which this update is based.

Dr. James A. 'Jimmy' Hubbard continued to serve as pastor of Mount Pleasant until April 2, 1989. Rev. Hunter Church served as interim pastor until October 1, 1989 when the present pastor, Rev. Ricky Dale Speas came on the field. Randy Triplett, Kevin Brown, Ronald Huffman, Tim Shaw and Terry Church were ordained as deacons during the period covered by this report. Church membership has increased slightly more than 10% - from 442 in 1985 to 488 in 1992. However, as with many other churches, Sunday School enrollment and average attendance have declined. The average annual compound rate of decline in enrollment has been 2.5%, and in average åttendance, 2.3%.

Mount Pleasant has been supportive of missions. They gave financial support to the Brazil Partnership. Pastor and Mrs. Speas travelled to Brazil in 1990 as members of a witnessing team from the association. In both 1991 and 1992, the church provided financial support and workers for a mission project in Virginia. They also took action to meet some needs of the local community. A ministry to senior citizens was started in 1985, along with a tape ministry for shut-ins. Monetary assistance is given to Champion Fire Department each year. When the church's needs dictated the acquisition of a faster copier, the old one was donated to the fire department. The nursery facilities at the church were made available for the children of parents enrolled in the Adult Education Program at Mount Pleasant School. When schoolsponsored baccalaureate services were eliminated, Mount Pleasant volunteered their assistance to the members of the graduating class at West Wilkes High School to enable those services to continue to be held.

A children's choir, for 3-6 year olds, has been started. The Older Children's Choir performed the drama "Sounds of Christmas". To meet the needs of youngsters in the community, new playground equipment was added in 1990 and 1991. A summer youth worker was hired this year.

Buildings and equipment have been maintained and upgraded to meet the needs of the church. The driveway, and additional parking space behind the church, was paved in 1989. A church bus was purchased in 1990. The choir acquired new robes in 1990, and new Baptist Hymnals were bought in 1991. The pastor's study was renovated, the church re-roofed, and the church and educational building painted in early 1991. Later that year, the sound system was enhanced and the telephone system was expanded. A new copier was purchased in 1992, along with an overhead projector, computer, and folding machine. The electrical system was improved, the parsonage painted and new windows installed, and additional landscaping completed - all in 1992. The value of church property is now in excess of \$500,000.

Members of the congregation have been saddened by the death of several leaders in the church during this period. Some of those lost by death are: C. M. Brown (8 Oct 1985), Kenneth Church (19 Feb 1988), Sibley Lee Turner (3 Jul 1989) and Belva Eller Minton (6 Dec 1989).

Constitution

PREAMBLE

We, the Baptist Churches of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association, unite according to the plan and for the purpose and work of New Testament churches in our world. To this end and according to the following articles, we cooperate to the fullest extent possible with the State and Southern Baptist Convention and subscribe to the principles of the 1963 Baptist Faith and Message statement.

ARTICLE I - NAME

This body shall be known as the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association of North Carolina.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

It shall be the purpose of this Association to consider and promote measures for increasing the harmony, the knowledge and the spiritual life of the churches and for developing and directing their energies and their contributions in the advancement of Christ's kingdom throughout the earth, always in harmony with the teachings of the New Testament. This Association shall be an auxiliary of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in all their missionary, educational and benevolent work.

To accomplish this purpose, the association shall seek to: (1) enhance the fellowship among member churches; (2) present the Gospel of Jesus Christ to everyone in our area; (3) encourage and facilitate church growth and development and provide other services to the churches; (4) coordinate mission ministries in our area and promote cooperation in state, home and foreign missions; and, (5) provide an additional channel by which member churches may interact with Southern Baptist agencies and institutions.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches desiring to affiliate with it. Any church desiring to become a member of the Association shall present, through messengers chosen for that purpose, its request for membership on APPLICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP form provided in the minutes along with a UNIFORM ASSOCIATIONAL LETTER provided by the clerk, at any annual session of the body. The moderator shall refer the application to the Committee on Membership for study and investigation. The church shall maintain for the year the status of associate membership until the committee makes its recommendation. If favorable, it will be received into full membership with all the rights and privileges at the next annual session. If the Association then votes to receive the church, the moderator shall extend the hand of fellowship to the messengers. SECTION 2. The Association shall be sole judge of its membership and may receive churches, or reject churches, according to its Constitution and Bylaws. Member churches may withdraw from the Association as they desire. Any church in the Association which fails to cooperate with the Association shall, upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee of the Association, be contacted by the Membership Committee to determine the intentions of the church regarding its remaining in the Association.

A cooperating church shall be defined as one which sends an annual report to the Association and messengers to Associational meetings, and contributes to the financial program of the Association.

SECTION 3. The Association shall withdraw fellowship from any church in its membership which shall be found to be disorderly in faith and practice, but not written charges are brought against it, which charges shall have been authorized by the official act of the church offering the same, or by the Membership Committee of the Association. Thereafter, any such charges shall be carefully considered by the Association at its next annual session.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The Annual Session of the Association shall be held on Monday and Tuesday following the first Sunday in October. SECTION 2. The Mid-Year Meeting shall be held on Monday

following the first Sunday in April.

SECTION 3. The Association may be called into special session, if necessary, by a majority vote of the Executive Committee, provided the churches are given two weeks' notice and announcement of the purpose of the meeting.

SECTION 4. In case of emergency, the Executive Committee shall have the authority to change the time and/or place of meetings, and shall be responsible for providing churches with sufficient notice of change.

SECTION 5. Each church is entitled to be represented by its pastor, other ordained ministers holding membership in the church, and such additional messengers as will permit a total of 10 messengers. Churches with more than 500 members are entitled to an additional messenger for each 100 members more than the initial 500. Messengers shall be elected annually for all Associational meetings. It is suggested that at least five of the messengers be leaders of individual church organizations.

ARTICLE V - AUTHORITY

While independent and sovereign in its own sphere, the Association does not claim, and will never attempt to exercise any authority over any other Baptist Body, whether church or auxiliary organization.

ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS AND THIER ELECTION

SECTION 1. Officers of this Association shall be the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Trustees, Brotherhood Director, Church Training Director, Evangelism Director, Missions Development Director, Music Director, Stewardship Director, Sunday School Director, Vacation Bible School Director, and Woman's Missionary Union Director.

SECTION 2. The Brotherhood Director, Discipleship Training Director, Evangelism Director, Missions Development Director, Music Director, Stewardship Director, Sunday School Director, Vacation Bible School Director and Woman's Missionary Union Director shall be elected at the April Mid-Year Meeting. All other officers will be elected at the Annual Session. The nominees shall be contacted and nominated by the Nomination Committee. Nominations may also be made from the floor.

SECTION 3. Officers shall serve for a term of one year, unless stated otherwise, and shall assume their duties at the close of the meetings at which they are elected.

SECTION 4. Whenever vacancies occur during the year, the Nominating Committee will present the names of replacements at a regular meeting of the Executive Committee for approval. These will serve until the close of the next Annual Session or until successors are elected.

SECTION 5. Any person having served two terms as Moderator shall be ineligible for re-election for a period of two years.

ARTICLE VII - TRUSTEES AND THEIR ELECTION

There shall be three Trustees of the Association, one of whom should be an attorney. Trustees shall be elected for an indefinite term and shall serve at the pleasure of the Association.

ARTICLE VIII - THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. Membership: The Executive Committee shall be composed of the officers of the Association, the Representative on the General Board of the Baptist State Convention, the ministers who are pasters in the Association, and one lay representative elected by each church, and the chairmen of all standing committees of the Association.

SECTION 2. Duties: The Executive Committee shall have the authority to act for the Association between sessions, except as limited by the Constitution. The Executive Committee shall carry out other requirements as set forth in this Constitution and Bylaws. It shall be the duty of this committee to meet in January and July, and to make reports and recommendations to the Association at its Annual Session. Twenty members shall constitute a quorum to transact business after notice of such meetings has been given to all members. The Officers of this committee shall be the Moderator, the Vice-Moderator and the Clerk of the Association, who shall be the Secretary. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to see that the committee meets at least quarterly and at any other time deemed necessary. All other provisions of this constitution and Bylaws notwithstanding, the Executive Committee shall not be empowered to convey property, incur long-term indebtedness, nor employ or terminate personnel.

ARTICLE IX - MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL

SECTION 1. Membership: The Missions Development Council shall be composed of the Program Directors of the Association and the Director of Missions, who shall serve as chairman.

SECTION 2. Duties: The Missions Development Council shall be convened at least quarterly, by the Chairman, with called meetings as required. The Council shall plan and promote the programs and interests of the Association. The Council shall: (1) Initiate, review and recommend plans for involving officers, organizations, and committees in attaining the goals of the Association; (2) Study the needs of the churches and people of the Association; (3) Serve as a Calendar Committee in accordance with Bylaw IV. The Council should concern itself with the preparation of the Associational Calendar and present it to the Annual Session for consideration. Any committee chairperson may attend the council meeting at any time to present plans and programs involving that committee.

ARTICLE X - COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The Association shall have the following standing committees with terms of office being from the close of the October meeting through the following October meeting:

SECTION 1. The employment of a Director of Missions shall follow the procedure outlined in Bylaw VI, Section 1, with the understanding that said person be extended an indefinite call and that a period of reasonable notice be given by either the missionary or the Association in the event of termination of such employment.

SECTION 2. The Director of Missions shall be empowered to procure and supervise necessary secretarial and janitorial personnel for the proper operation and maintenance of the Associational office, provided that funds for the hiring and salary of such personnel have been included within the current year's budget.

SECTION 3. All questions of order not herein provided for shall be decided according to Robert's Rules of Order, Revised.

SECTION 4. Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any annual session upon vote of two-thirds of the members present, provided that such amendments be presented on the first day of the annual session and voted upon the second day.

SECTION 5. ROTATING OF COMMITTEES. One-third of each committee shall be elected to serve a period of three years. Committees or parts of committees composed of program directors shall not be subject to rotation. No member shall succeed himself for more than one additional term. Vacancies occurring during the year may be filled by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 6. SPECIAL ADVISORS. The Moderator and Director of Missions will serve on all committees of the Association as special advisors.

BYLAWS

BYLAW I - GENERAL

SECTION 1. The Association shall convene as provided by the Constitution (Article IV, Section 1, 2, 3, 4).

SECTION 2. Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercise.

SECTION 3. A majority of the members present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of any business except the matter of making changes in the Constitution.

SECTION 4. Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator, shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration and avoid the use of unnecessary personalities.

SECTION 5. The members shall observe toward the officers and towards one another such courtesies as are becoming to Christians.

SECTION 6. The annual Associational year, for the purpose of reporting statistical information, shall be September 1 to August 31, inclusive.

SECTION 1. Moderator

The Moderator shall preside over meetings of the body according to the constitution and bylaws. He shall be chairman of the Executive Committee and be ex-officio member of all other committees. He shall see that the Executive Committee meets in January and July and at any other time deemed necessary. He shall be elected for one year and shall not succeed himself after the second consecutive year.

SECTION 2. Vice-Moderator

The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence, or at the pleasure of the Moderator, and shall be vice chairman of the Executive Committee.

SECTION 3. Clerk

The Clerk shall provide annual report forms at least 30 days before the October meeting, distribute at the October meeting copies of a digest of these reports, make an accurate record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distribution of minutes, records, and other documents of the Association, and serve also as secretary of the Executive Committee.

SECTION 4. Treasurer

The Treasurer shall receive and bank all funds of the Association in the name of the Association; disburse the same upon instructions from the Association, its Executive Committee, or as designated in the budget; render an accurate report of receipts and disbursements and distribute same at the October meeting; give an oral report at each regular meeting of the Association or its Executive committee; and keep books available and up-to-date for examination.

The Treasurer shall serve as a member of the Committee on Finance.

The Chairman of the Committee on Finance shall have authority to act for the Treasurer in the event the Treasurer is incapacitated.

SECTION 5. Auditor

The Auditor shall, at the close of the fiscal year, make an audit of the Treasurer's records.

SECTION 6. Historian

The Historian, in his sole discretion, shall collect facts of interest to the Association and the cooperating churches, and shall make a report to each annual session of the Association.

SECTION 7. Program Directors

The Program Directors of the Association shall include the Directors of Sunday School, Church Training, Brotherhood, WMU, Music, Evangelism, School of Christian Studies, and such special missions project coordinators as may be selected in response to ministry projects adopted by the Association. These shall be in charge of their respective organizations during their tenure of service. SECTION 1. Committee on Personnel

The Committee on Personnel shall be composed of six members, each of whom will serve a tenure of three years, with two members rotating off the Committee each year. The Committee will prepare necessary, position descriptions of and update, as all Associational staff personnel, excluding the Director of Missions whose responsibilities are described by Bylaw VI. It shall survey the need for additional staff positions; recruit, interview, and recommend to the Association or its Executive Committee new employed personnel; and, when necessary, recommend to the Executive Committee the termination of employment of staff personnel. The Committee shall review annually salaries and benefits, and make recommendations to the Finance Committee. It shall review at least annually the performance of each employee, receive any grievance, and otherwise seek to promote harmonious relationships between all employees of the Association.

SECTION 2. Committee on Youth

The Committee on Youth shall be composed of six (6) members, one of which shall be a minister who shall serve as chairman. The committee shall be concerned with ways of relating youth to the churches of the Association and shall lead the churches and association to plan programs and activities that will meet their needs.

SECTION 3. Committee on Evangelism

The Committee on Evangelism, composed of three members, shall promote the work of Evangelism within the Association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. All plans and programs shall be subject to approval by the Association or its Executive Committee. The Evangelism Committee shall be chaired by the Director of Evangelism.

SECTION 4. Committee on Finance

A. The Committee on Finance, composed of six members and the Treasurer, shall study the Association's financial needs for an adequate program, prepare and present a budget to the Association for the following year, devise and develop plans for securing the cooperation of churches in providing funds to meet the budget, and make a written report at the October meeting.

B. In the event it becomes necessary to borrow funds for current operating expenses of the Association, the Committee on Finance is authorized to instruct the Trustees to secure by loan an amount not to exceed 10 percent of the annual budget for a period not to exceed 90 days, and to renew the loan as needed.

SECTION 5. Committee on Ordinations

The Committee on Ordinations, composed of seven ministers, shall when requested by a member church, assist with the examination and ordination of candidates for the Gospel Ministry. Churches wishing to ordain ministers are requested to place their candidates before the Committee at least 30 days prior to the date set for examination on the following principles: a. Christian experience or conversion

b. Call to the ministry

c. Attitude toward denominational work and objects

d. Support of denominational causes

e. Moral and spiritual fitness

f. Doctrinal beliefs

g. Biblical knowledge

Candidates are to be ordained with the assistance of this Committee only when they are serving a church or churches as pastor or having been called as pastor of a Baptist church of like faith and practice with those member churches of this Association.

and practice with those member churches of this Association. No candidate for ordination shall be considered by the committee who has not been a member of a cooperating church for at least one year. The Committee shall consider only male members for ordination.

Candidates are to be urged to prepare themselves for the ministry as far as possible in Baptist institutions of higher learning.

This Committee shall not recommend any candidate for ordination whom they feel will not bring honor and esteem to the Lord, to Southern Baptist and to the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association.

Recommendations will be made by the Committee to the church where the candidate holds membership. The Committee will assist the church in the ordination service at a time convenient to the church and to the members of the Committee if such assistance is desired.

SECTION 6. Committee on Memorials

The Committee on Memorials, composed of three members, shall bring a report at the October meeting and lead in a memorial service in memory of those reported by the churches as deceased since the last annual meeting.

SECTION 7. Committee on Nominations

The Committee on Nominations, composed of seven members, shall contact and nominate at the April or October meeting of the Association, the officers and representatives of the Association according to Article VI of the Constitution.

SECTION 8. Committee on Constitution

The Committee on Constitution, composed of five members, shall be available to study any changes or revisions in the Constitution, and to make recommendations as needed to keep the Constitution in line with the policies and programs of the Association.

SECTION 9. Committee on Membership

The Committee on Membership, composed of five (5) members, shall perform the duties as set forth in the Constitution, Article III.

SECTION 10. Committee on Committees

The Committee on Committees, composed of seven (7) members, shall be appointed by the Moderator at the mid-year meeting, and shall nominate persons to be elected by the Association to serve on all standing committees. SECTION 11. Committee on Place and Preachers

The Committee on Place and Preachers, composed of three (3) members, shall receive or solicit invitations for the place or places for meetings of the Association, and shall recommend the places. It shall also recommend the preachers and alternates for the annual sermons.

SECTION 12. Committee on Resolutions

The Committee on Resolutions, composed of three (3) members, shall draw up and present to the Association at the October meeting resolutions of appreciation and any other resolution it may deem expedient.

SECTION 13. Committee on Enrollment

The Committee on Enrollment, composed of five (5) members, shall prepare for and direct the enrollment of messengers at all sessions of Associational meetings. Each messenger shall be enrolled only once during the October meeting. This Committee shall be prepared to report on enroliment when called for during meetings.

SECTION 14. Properties Committee

The Properties Committee, composed of three (3) members, shall be responsible for the maintenance of all properties owned or leased by the Association or its Trustees.

SECTION 15. The Calendar Committee

The Calendar Committee shall be composed of the following Associational officers: Director of Missions, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, WMU Director, Brotherhood Director of Music Ministry, and President of Director, the Ministers' Conference. This Committee shall prepare an Associational calendar for the year, and present same to the annual meeting for adoption. This calendar shall be included in the annual.

SECTION 16. School of Christian Studies Committee

The School of Christian Studies Committee shall work with the Director of the School of Christian Studies to plan, promote, and implement the offering of such courses of study as will meet the needs of pastors and laypersons in the areas of biblical studies, historical theology, Baptist life, church administration, Christian education, and pastoral training.

SECTION 17. Program Planning Committee The Program Planning Committee shall be composed of five (5) members. It shall be their responsibility to prepare the agenda and arrange for speakers (other than the two primary messages of the Annual Meeting which are the responsibility of the Place and Preacher Committee) for all plenary meetings of the association.

SECTION 18. Mission Ministries Committee

The Mission Ministries Committee shall be composed of five (5) persons who shall be chosen so as to be representative of each geographical division of the associational area. It shall be the responsibility of this committee to discover, evaluate, and recommend mission and/or ministry needs for the consideration of the Associational Missions Development Council and thence to the Association in session. This committee shall be represented by its chairperson on the Missions Development Council.

SECTION 1. The Nominating Committee in its report to the Annual Meeting shall nominate the following representatives: Children's Homes, Christian Education, Foreign Missions, Retirement Homes, Home Missions, Hospital, Annuity Board, Religious Literature, State Missions.

SECTION 2. These representatives shall familiarize themselves with the work of the institution or agency which they represent. They shall promote the work and encourage churches to support it. They shall secure or write a report on their institution or agency. If called upon by the Program Committee they shall make a report at the Annual Session. In any case they shall prepare their report to be included in the Minutes of the Association.

BYLAW V - TRUSTEES

The legal title to all real and personal property of the Association shall be vested in the trustees and their successors in such office. The said trustees may convey said property by legal instruments pursuant to resolutions adopted and approved by the Association. They shall handle all legal matters of the Association under the direction of the said Association. See Article VII of the Constitution.

BYLAW VI - DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

SECTION 1. The Director of Missions shall be elected by the Association upon the recommendation of a special Director of Association upon the recommendation of a special prector of Missions Search Committee. The Director of Missions Search Committee shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association or by the Executive Committee. The Director of Missions Search Committee shall be composed of seven (7) members who shall be representative of the churches in the Association both numerically and geographically. Upon his election, the Director of Missions shall become a member of all committees and organizations of the Association. The relationship between the Association and its Director of Missions may be terminated following a reasonable notice given by either party.

SECTION 2. The Director of Missions shall promote the work and witness of the Association and denomination, cooperating with the churches, their pastors and officers and Associational committees and organizations.

- A. He shall be responsible for planning, promoting, and executing the ministry of the Association in cooperation with the Executive Committee and the Missions Development Council.
- B. He shall make an annual report to the Association at the October meeting.
- C. He shall be an ex officio member of all committees of the Association, serving in an advisory and/or resource capacity. D. He shall seek to visit each church in the Association in order
- to:

- (1) Enrich Christian fellowship among the churches.
- (2) Encourage and strengthen the ministry of the churches.
- (3) Enhance the cooperative relationship between the churches and the Association.
- E. He shall, when necessary, conduct surveys or inquiries in order to determine specific needs for ministry within the area of the Association.
- F. He shall, upon request, provide a list of qualified persons who may be considered by churches seeking pastors.
- G. He shall have full administrative responsibility for all personnel employed by the Association. SECTION 3.
- A. The Director of Missions is entitled to two weeks vacation annually. Upon completion of five years service, the Director of Missions shall be entitled to three weeks annual vacation. Vacation is to be taken within the calendar year, and it is not accumulative.
- B. The Director of Missions is entitled to 30 days sick leave per calendar year, sick leave is not to be taken as vacation, and it is not accumulative.
- C. The Director of Missions is entitled to four weeks per calendar year which he may use at his discretion for personal enrichment, professional development, and speaking engagements or revivals outside the Association. This time is not accumulative.

SECTION 4. Should there occur at any time a grievance on the part of the Association or the Director of Missions, either party may consult with the Moderator and Chairman of the Personnel Committees.

BYLAW VII - ANNUAL REPORTS

Persons who are to bring reports to the October meeting of the Association shall present the same to the Director of Missions or Clerk two weeks prior to the October meeting for these to be included in the Book of Reports.

BYLAW VII - AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the Bylaws may be made at any session of the October meeting of the Association when presented in writing and approved by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

PROCEEDINGS

of the

One Hundred Twenty-Second Annual Meeting

- 1. The 122nd annual session of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association was called to order at 4:00 p.m. at Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church by Moderator Rick Speas.
- 2. Pastor Rick Speas welcomed the 181 messengers and visitors.
- 3. The congregation joined in singing "Tell It Out With Gladness" led by Anna Marie Benge accompanied by Stacy Lambert at the piano.
- 4. Devotion and prayer was given by Rev. Darrell Poole, New Hope Baptist Church.
- 5. Mrs. Lesley Speas, Chairperson of the Program Committee, moved the adoption of the Order of Business with any necessary changes that may be needed. Seconded, adopted.
- "The Lord Let Me Be The One" Rev. Robert Duncan, Oakwoods 6. Baptist Church, spoke about the Brazil Partnership. His report is on page 17 of the Book of Reports (BOR). The Brazil Partnership was extended one more year past the original five year commitment. Rev. Duncan thanked Rev. Ken Jones for arranging this last trip, which made their sixth trip. He also thanked Bill McKinney, Jim Gore, and everyone for their part in supporting these mission trips. On this last trip, almost 1,100 people gave their hearts to Jesus. Rev. Duncan stated that he preached eight or nine times a day - it was very tiring. One night while they were on home visitation, there were several people saved. At 11:30 p.m. that night, he led a whole family to Christ. He asked prayer that the association continue the mission work. He stated that he has a video of the last service they did in Brazil if anyone would like to view it.

BUSINESS SESSION

- A. The Memorials Committee Report was given by Rev. Earl Adams who read the list of deceased and led in prayer. There was a total of 104 deaths.
- B. Rev. Jerry Fuller gave the Evangelism Report. "Here's Hope, Share Jesus Now" is the 1995 simultaneous revival theme. He stated that God has given each born again Christian the power to win others to Christ. January through March, 1995 he asked that several people pledge to share Christ with 60 people (one person a day).
- C. The Finance Committee Report was given by Mr. Paul Holbrook, chairman of the committee. He moved for the adoption of the report, seconded, adopted.

- D. Rev. Paul Shoupe, Chairman of the Membership Committee, stated that their report was on page 23 of the BOR and made the following motion: The Membership Committee recommends Greater Vision Baptist Church for membership in the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association. Seconded, adopted. Moderator Speas recognized the pastor and messengers from Greater Vision and stated that they would be given the right hand of fellowship as everyone breaks for the evening meal.
- E. The Ordination Committee Report was given by Rev. Sherrill Wellborn. They met on September 9 to examine Glen Moore and recommended that he be ordained into the ministry.
- F. Dr. Jimmy Hubbard gave the Place and Preacher Report printed on page 16 of the BOR and moved for adoption. Seconded, adopted.
- G. Mr. Clyde Bumgarner, Chairman of the Properties Committee, gave his report and apologized for not getting a printed report in. He stated that they had done a few things but that there are several things that still need to be done.
- H. Director of Missions, Lawson Horton, moved the adoption of the calendar and stated that a change had to be made in the date for the Semi-Annual Meeting in April. The motion was stated as follows: According to the Constitution, Article IV, Section 2, the Mid-Year Meeting shall be held on Monday following the first Sunday in April. The Calendar Committee is recommending that the Mid-Year Meeting in 1994 be moved to Monday, April 11 because of Easter Monday falling on April 4. Seconded, adopted.
- Mr. Fred Wyatt, Chairman of the Dedication of Annuals Committee, stated that the 1993 Annual of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association is being dedicated to Rev. Vaughn Brown.
- J. Mr. George McNeil, Historian for the association, stated that the histories for Little Rock and Mt. Pleasant Baptist Churches was printed on pages 8-10 in the BOR. He encouraged the church clerks to have church records microfilmed at Wake Forest University. There is no charge for this service.
- K. The Nominating Committee Report was given by Rev. Al Andrews. The officers and representatives that are to be elected are printed on page 4 of the BOR. He moved for adoption. Seconded, adopted.
- L. The congregation joined in singing "I'll Tell The World That I'm A Christian" led by Anna Marie Benge accompanied by Stacy Lambert at the piano.
- M. Rev. Ted Miller gave the Committee on Committees Report. He read the list of committee members to be

elected and moved for the adoption. Seconded, adopted. N. The Treasurer's Report was given by Mrs. Teresa Taylor.

- O. Mr. Pete Lovette gave the General Board Report. He stated that he has been blessed to serve on the General Board. There is an effort underway by the Baptist State Convention to be more helpful to the churches. They will meet with individual associations to find out the needs of churches. If your church would like to schedule a visit, please call the Baptist State Convention at 1-800-395-5102.
- P. Miscellaneous Business:
 - a. DOM Lawson Horton stated that soon it will be the 125th anniversary of our association. He made a motion as follows: I would like to recommend that a special committee of eight be appointed by the Moderator to work with the current Historian in developing a printed history of the Brushy Mountain Baptist Association in conjunction with our 125th anniversary. Seconded, adopted.
- Q. Rev. Robert Duncan gave the Sunday School Report (page 29 in the BOR). He stated that if anyone would like to serve on the ASSIST Team, to please call him or the associational office.
- R. Since no oral report was presented, Moderator Speas stated that the Discipleship Training Report is located on page 15 in the BOR.
- S. Mrs. Mae Duncan introduced Mrs. Deborah Sullivan as the new Associational WMU Director. Mrs. Sullivan stated that the WMU Report was located on page 18 of the BOR. She also gave the following dates and events: October 10 is World Hunger Day - a truck will be parked at Wilkesboro Baptist Church from 2:00-4:00 p.m. for Wilkes Cares; November 1 is World Day of Prayer; November 11 is the Foreign Missions Study to be taught by Barbara Joiner at Millers Creek Baptist Church. Men are also invited to attend.
- T. The Brotherhood Report was given by Mr. Doug Rollins (page 20-21 in BOR). Doug stated that a mission team went to Graffiti House this past April to help get rid of mice and rats. The team served the Lord by nailing up boards. Doug introduced Mr. Dale Brown to share his experiences on trips to Graffiti. He stated "It's hard to describe what it feels like to see God at work first hand." "It's like trying to tell someone what molasses taste like." "You don't know until you experience it." "Just like molasses, you need to taste this for yourself."
- U. Mrs. Anna Marie Benge gave a brief Music Report. She spoke of the hopes for the coming year.
- V. Moderator Speas recognized the visitors: Mr. Bill Overby, Mr. Grover Blackburn, and Rev. and Mrs. R.A. Call.

END OF BUSINESS SESSION

- 7. The congregation joined in singing "Share His Love" led by Anna Marie Benge accompanied by Stacy Lambert at the piano.
- 8. Mr. Bill Gverby, Baptist Foundation, stated that there was a report on page 34 of the BOR. He spoke on Christian Stewardship Estate Planning. In 1978 the Baptist Foundation conducted a six county survey and discovered through the estates of those who gave, 65/1000 of 1% was given to the Baptist Foundation (Baptist causes). If each one had given a tenth, a million dollars would have been given. January is Make Your Will month. The sun will never set on what you do through the Foundation. You can give to the Foundation <u>and</u> to your family <u>and</u> save the family estate taxes. A representative will come to your church and do a seminar if you request it.
- 9. Mr. Grover Blackburn, Campbell University, gave a report on Baptist colleges. Over the last seven years there has been a steady increase in enrollment. Eight-five percent of students receive some kind of financial aid. Contact the Financial Aid Representative at the Baptist Colleges. All Cooperative Program receipts that are received by the colleges is used for scholarships for the students. Approximately 90,000 students are on Baptist college campuses. Please consider sending your children or grandchildren to a Baptist college. A student will grow academically <u>and</u> spiritually. Students go on mission trips, do local mission activities, etc. Baptist colleges are worth what they cost.
- 10. DOM Lawson Horton made several announcements: (a) World Hunger Day is October 10. There will be a truck at Wilkesboro Baptist Church from 2:00-4:00 p.m. for Wilkes Cares. (b) We are still in need of volunteers for the Agricultural Fair. (c) Sherrill Lowe, Associational Bible Drill Director, has scheduled a workshop on October 21 at 7:00 p.m. at GOSHEN Baptist Church. There will be a representative from the Baptist State Convention to speak on Children's and Youth Bible Drill and also on Youth Speaker's Tournament. (d) He stated that there were some materials on the front pew for each church.
- 11. Moderator Speas made a brief report on "True Love Waits" sexual abstinence. Call the associational office for more information.
- 12. Mr. Bill Stillerman, Baptist Retirement Homes of NC, spoke on the need to change the way NC Baptists think about older adult's contributions and needs. North Carolina ranks number ten in having the greatest number of people over 65. We're getting older, 36,000 people in the United States are 100 years old or older. The greatest problem we are facing is older adults taking care of a disabled/sick spouse and an aging parent. Pray that NC Baptists will change the way they think about older adults.

- 13. Moderator Speas gave the benediction and blessing of the meal and the meeting was recessed for the evening meal. The right hand of fellowship was also given to Greater Vision Baptist Church on the way to the meal.
- 14. The meeting was reconvened at 7:00 p.m. with Moderator Rick Speas presiding. He welcomed the 245 messengers and visitors representing 36 churches.
- 15. The congregation joined in singing "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" led by Anna Marie Benge accompanied by Andrea Lyall at the piano.
- 16. Rev. Ken Pardue, Stony Hill Baptist Church, read scripture from Isaiah 6:1-8 and led in prayer.
- 17. Vice-Moderator Sam Childs introduced the new pastors in our association: Rev. Leon Church (Davis Memorial), Rev. Vance Triplett (Elk), Dr. Paul Brunner, Interim (First Baptist), Rev. Jimmy McGlammery (Friendly Grove), Rev. Lyn Lambert and wife, Debbie (Greater Vision), Minister of Music and Youth Rev. Wade Ivey and wife, Francine (Liberty Grove), Rev. Darrell Poole (New Hope), Rev. Ralph Stanley, Interim (Pleasant Home), Rev. Paul Hugger (Welcome Home), and Minister of Music and Children Rev. Morris Driggers (Wilkesboro).
- 18. Special music was presented by Mrs. Lesley Speas who sang "Let Me Be The One".
- 19. Rev. Jim Gore, World Missions Revival Coordinator, spoke on the World Missions Revival to be held May 1-8, 1994 in our association. He placed handouts in the pews for everyone to have a copy. Missionaries are some of God's choice people. Twenty churches have chosen to participate in the World Missions Revival. If your church wants to participate, please let us know within the next seven days. For more information, please call Jim or Lawson Horton. Rev. Gore announced that an offering would be taken to help offset the expenses of the World Missions Revival.
- 20. The Associational Choir sang "Name of Jesus Medley" during the offering led by Anna Marie Benge accompanied by Andrea Lyall at the piano.
- 21. "The Lord Let Me Be The One", Jennifer Harrold, Wilkesboro Baptist Church. She went on a youth mission trip to Kentland, Indiana. They had gone six years ago and it was good to go back and see what had taken place in the last six years. They went to help with construction needs and conduct VBS. They immediately started replacing roofs, painted, cleaned, etc. They went over to Sheldon, Illinois to conduct a Backyard Bible Club in the park. A church was started from a Backyard Bible Club they did six years ago. The Wilkesboro Baptist Church Clown Troupe performed some of the things they had done in Indiana and Illinois. The clowns performed at the county fair. Sometimes clowns can get a message across when we can't. Mrs. Harrold stated, and if we can't go, we can give, and we can pray so others may go.

- 22. The Associational Choir sang "Stepping on the Clouds" and "Written in Red" led by Anna Marie Benge accompanied by Andrea Lyall at the piano.
- Dr. Jimmy Hubbard, pastor of Zion Hill Baptist Church, 23. brought the evening message. He read scripture from Daniel and Peter. His sermon topic was "The church in the company of lions". Daniel found himself in the company of lions. Christians find themselves in the company of lions. We need encouragement in our church. Daniel was preferred by King Darius because he had an excellent spirit in him. The church is preferred by King Jesus because she has an excellent spirit in her and is His church. If we have the spirit working in our lives and churches, we will be preferred by King Jesus. Daniel was plotted against. Don't belittle another church or get jealous. Satan, the royal lion, plots against the church. He can steal away our joy of salvation. He knows our weaknesses and will plot against us. Daniel prayed in front of the open window (not in secret). He did not fear because he was God's man. When the Devil bothers us, get behind God. Daniel didn't get upset - churches get upset. We don't need to have pity parties - "God don't attend pity parties". Daniel was cast into the den of lions - he didn't forsake his God and his God didn't forsake him. Daniel was protected - "my God has protected me". God protects His servants. As Daniel rested in the den of lions, so shall we rest in the presence of God. Daniel prospered we will receive a crown and a compliment. The church will be victorious.
- 24. The congregation joined in singing "Here Am I, Send Me" led by Anna Marie Benge accompanied by Andrea Lyall at the piano.
- 25. "The Lord Let Me Be The One", Mr. Bob Johnson, Cub Creek Baptist Church talked about his trip to Florida to help with Hurricane Andrew cleanup. He took his first trip with a group from Millers Creek Baptist Church. His second trip, he and his wife took their camper and stayed for six weeks. He stated that the Lord will open doors if we let Him.
- 26. "The Lord Let Me Be The One", Rev. Arnold Gosnell, Millers Creek Baptist Church spoke about the youth doing a Backyard Bible Club in a trailer park in August. He hopes that they can do another one next summer. Mr. Harold Cooper spoke of the trip that the group took to Florida City, Florida in November to help with Hurricane Andrew cleanup. They were not prepared for the destruction they encountered. Prior to the storm, in that area none of the denominations, churches or associations would work together. After the storm, all denominations, churches and associations worked together (200-300 people a day were being reached for Christ). Their group was split up into three smaller groups. One group repaired a house. One group worked on building small buildings for the people still living in tents. The other group worked on rebuilding a church. They were all blessed because they went. Mr. Cooper gave a challenge to all the

leaders in the churches - "attempt great things for the Lord".

- Special music was presented by Rev. Morris Driggers, Wilkesboro Baptist Church, who sang "In His Eyes" and played the guitar.
- 28. DOM Lawson Horton gave the Ukraine Partnership Report. The association has entered a three year partnership with the Ukraine. One year of this partnership will end this November. They need teams to help construct churches. There are three areas that the Ukrainian Baptists have asked for help with from NC Baptists. (1) Construction of church buildings; (2) a seminary in Keiv; (3) financial support for 100 home missionaries at \$62 a month or \$744 a year. DOM Horton encouraged us to consider financial support and prayer support for the Ukraine. Either a church, a group of churches, or the whole association could provide the support. We need people who are willing to give. The people are there and have needs. He prays that we will hear God's voice.
- 29. "The Lord Let Me Be The One", Mike Archenbronn, Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church, spoke about his trip to Buffalo, NY in July. He stated that the weather was very hot and the hearts were very cold. One of his best blessings was working with the Russian children in the Backyard Bible Club in the park. They handed out 1,000 flyers. He state that "Those who have the least, hunger the most for the Word of God. He asked prayer for Rick Erb, pastor of Calvary Christian Church.
- 30. Special music was presented by Anna Marie Benge who sang "I Am Not Ashamed of the Gospel".
- 31. Rev. Dennis Love, Pilgrim Baptist Church, gave the benediction and the meeting adjourned at 9:00 p.m.

SECOND DAY

Pre-session concert was presented by Rev. and Mrs. Wade Ivey, Liberty Grove Baptist Church, from 6:45-7:00 p.m.

- 32. The second day of the 122nd Annual Meeting was called to order by Vice-Moderator Sam Childs at 7:00 p.m. on October 5, 1993 at Little Rock Baptist Church.
- 33. The congregation joined in singing "Tell It Out With Gladness" led by Mrs. Lesley Speas accompanied by Rev. Wade Ivey at the keyboard and Mrs. Martha Childs at the piano.
- Rev. Lyn Lambert, Greater Vision Baptist Church, read scripture from Nehemiah 2:17 and 4:6 and led in prayer.
- 35. Pastor Jerry Fuller welcomed the 189 messengers and visitors representing 31 churches.
- 36. Baptist State Convention Church Extension Consultant, Roy Holder, thanked everyone for their contributions to the State Missions Offering which provides: 86% of the state WMU's budget; 56% of the state Baptist Men's budget; food and fuel for the Disaster Relief Van which served 175,000 meals (10,000 people) in South Florida after Hurricane Andrew; the Baptist Men Medical/Dental Van which serves the

migrant workers and low income people; Church Extension gets a little over half of their money from this offering; multihousing ministry and new church starts. Over 52% of the people in NC are unchurched. Forty million people visit NC every year - resort ministries are funded by the State Missions Offering. At ninety-two mission points, services are held in fourteen different languages - possible through the State Missions Offering. The local association gets 10% of the offering from it's churches to use for missions. The goal this year is \$1.8 million.

- 37. "The Lord Let Me Be The One", Mr. Steve Call and youth (Laura, Crystal, and Joey), Welcome Home Baptist Church, talked about their trip to Gatlingburg, TN. They worked in four campgrounds. They started at 9:00 a.m. and canvassed the campground and invited children to their Backyard Bible Club. They also held night services with puppet shows and clowning 50-60 people attended the night services. Mr. Steve Call led two girls to the Lord but their parents would not let them attend church. They enjoyed a lot of fellowship among the mission team. Mr. Don Johnson, Welcome Home Baptist Church, stated that he has been on several mission trips, but that it was the youth going on mission trips that got him started. At the RA Jamboree, he led eleven boys to the Lord. He urged everyone who had been on a mission trip to spread the word when they get back.
- 38. Special music was presented by the Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church Ensemble.
- 39. The congregation joined in singing "Let Others See Jesus In You" led by Mrs. Lesley Speas accompanied by Rev. Wade Ivey at the keyboard and Mrs. Martha Childs at the pianc.
- 40. "The Lord Let Me Be The One", Mr. Wade Bumgarner and Mr. Kermit Whittington, Pilgrim Baptist Church, told about their trip to Florida to help with the Hurricane Andrew cleanup. They have seventeen members in their church Brotherhood. They stated that there is enough talent in every church to do anything that might come up. They went to Florida the last week in January. The Hurricane Andrew victims had tremendous physical needs, but the spiritual needs were greater. "God put us exactly where He wanted us to be." Rev. Earl Adams, Pilgrim Baptist Church, spoke on his trip to West Virginia to conduct VBS. His written report is on page 28 of the BOR. The only thing the team had to buy was registration forms and certificates - churches had donated the rest. He thanked all the churches and individuals that gave. They had twenty-two commitments made to the Lord.
- 41. "The Lord Let Me Be The One", Rev. Wade Ivey, Liberty Grove Baptist Church, spoke on the youth mission trip they made to Curry Beach where they conducted Backyard Bible Clubs. The youth did a great job. They had 100-110 people attending every night. They also conducted two Backyard Bible Clubs in North Wilkesboro.



DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS REPORT

Since our last annual meeting, I have visited 35 of our churches at least once and some more than once by special invitation. I preached 45 times and led in one revival. I also helped in Vacation Bible School in one church. I have visited in every church in our association since early July of 1992, and hope to complete my second visit by the end of this December. It has been a joy to visit each church and share in the worship service. Churches have personalities and abilities like children. Each church is unique and capable of doing things that others are not able to do. It has been a pleasant learning experience.

In fact, this entire year has been a learning experience. I have attended several conferences and workshops to better prepare myself for the task to which I have been called. I believe every meeting I attended has been helpful. I also received some good ideas from many in the association during the listening sessions that I conducted last winter.

It has been my pleasure to have been involved in two mission trips. One trip was to the inner-city homeless. The other trip was in July. Thirteen went to Florida City, FL to help with Hurricane Andrew cleanup. Mailed Martha Colwell's newsletter (missionary to Rwanda). Mailed the Rwandan Baptist Prayer Request newsletter. MORAVIAN FALLS - New Music Director - Mrs. Carolyn Horton. Purchased new hand-bells, started two hand-bell choirs. Clown ministry started. WMU published new church cook book. Foreign missionary and former pastor, Duane Kuykendall, brought homecoming message.

MT PLEASANT - Commissioning services for summer mission. Two baby dedications. Adoption of Long Range Report. Back Yard Bible Clubs. Started support of mission in Buffalo. Mission trip to Buffalo. Christmas cantata.

MT ZION - Held fall and spring revivals. Paved road into cemetery. Remodeled bathrooms. Made first church directory. Had Homecoming on June 27th.

OAKWOODS - The church year of 1992-93 was an eventful and busy year for Oakwoods. We had three revivals this year, beginning with August 30 through September 2 with Rev. Dean Crane of White Oak Baptist Church. The second revival was December 6 through December 9 with Evangelist Jamie Mayorga. The third revival was a joint effort with Lewis Fork and Oak Grove Baptist churches held at the John A. Walker Center with Evangelist Bailey Smith as the guest speaker. In the fall of 1992 Mike Hamby, a member of our church, announced his call into the ministry, and his intent to attend Fruitland Seminary in Hendersonville, NC. Oakwoods pledged to assist Mike financially with \$100 per month. Our church also voted to assist the Wilkes Prison Ministry with \$50 per month.

Oakwoods has 461 resident members and 97 non-resident members, for a total membership of 558. Our church continues to have two Sunday morning worship services. The early morning service has had an average attendance of 77 members and the 11 AM service continues to have about 190 members present. This is an average of 267 members present for the Sunday morning worship services. The Sunday night services continues to grow with an average attendance of 125 members. The most growth has been in the Wednesday night prayer service, with an average attendance of 95.

prayer service, with an average attendance of 95. Due to the tremendous growth our church has experienced in the past two years, it has been necessary to start a building program for a new sanctuary. On December of 1992, Oakwoods elected a Planning Committee to hire Bob Hamm as an architect to draw up plans for a new sanctuary. Plans for the new building is on schedule. The church hopes to break ground for the new building in March of 1994.

Oakwoods supported several mission organizations this year, giving \$1,275 to State Missions and \$2,946 to Home Missions. We



gave \$3,689 to the Lottie Moon Christmas offering, for a total of \$7,910 to designated missions. The church gave an additional \$6,655 for other mission oriented projects. Our church continues to give 10% to the Co-operative Program. As of September 1, 1993 we have \$166,000 in our building fund. In April of 1993, a special Commissioning Service was held for

In April of 1993, a special Commissioning Service was held for the associational mission trip to Brazil. Our pastor and seven members from other churches went on this follow-up mission work.

We lost four of our members this past year due to death. They were Mrs. Otha Opitz, Annie Lee Ellis Anderson, Mary Louise Jones Childress and Minnie Anderson Fletcher.

PILGRIM - Called pastor to full time ministry. Nine men went to Homestead, FL to help in the aftermath of Hurricane Andrew. Ordained three new deacons. Playground was built by the Brotherhood. Articles of Incorporation were completed for the church. Purchased a church van. A member helps in Vacation Bible School in West Virginia.

PLEASANT HOME - The church provided financial support for Hurricane Andrew relief. Two members of the Brotherhood traveled to south Florida to work on feeding and construction projects. The Brotherhood has also been involved in Graffiti House ministries. We hosted the Gardner-Webb University Concert Choir who presented their spring concert at our church on March 9. Financial planning seminars were conducted for two separate segments of the congregation - those needing to plan for their children's education, and those interested in planning for retirement. Our Minister of Senior Adults, Rev. R. Clinton Bailey, was killed in a car wreck on April 24. Two of our young men announced their call to Christian service and were licensed into the ministry. Our pastor resigned on July 31 to accept the pastorate of Shadybrook Baptist Church, Kannapolis, NC.

SHADY GROVE - The parking lot was paved. The sanctuary and classrooms were painted. Homecoming was held on August 8 and the fall revival began that evening.


STONY HILL - Two deacons, Dennis Whittington and Tommy Williams, ordained on May 30.

Thirteen of us went to Florida City, FL to help with Hurricane Andrew cleanup. Mailed out Martha Colwell's (Missionary to Rwanda) newsletter. Mailed out Rwandan Baptist Mission Prayer Requests. Sponsored BBQ fund-raiser for Brazil Land Purchase. Joe Hartzog went back to Graffiti House in New York. Built wheelchair ramps for Ricky Parsons. Built wheelchair ramp for Barbara Davis. Purchased Bibles for Wilkes Prison Ministry.

<u>Pilgrim</u> sent a group of men to help in disaster relief in Florida due to the devastation of Hurricane Andrew. Their main responsibility was to help rebuild the Florida City Baptist Church. They re-roofed their pastor's house, developed a play area for the children at church; they gave money to buy blankets for Bosnia, and provided money for a mission trip to Buffalo. Their final project for the year was to install some windows in a widow's house.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NC REPORT

Chris starts college at North Carolina State this fall on a football scholarship. After leading Thomasville to a state championship in 1991, Chris also earned national honor society recognition, was active in the community counseling drug abusers . . and became a Christian at Mills Home.

Kathy married a Christian young man who was a volunteer at Broyhill Home, where she lived. She continues her education at Haywood Technical College while working and becoming a young wife. She and her husband, Kris, are members at Woodland Baptist Church, where she was active in leading children's programs, even as a Broyhill resident.

Several rows of supportive staff members cried during the wedding when the minister asked, "Who gives this woman to be married?" Child care worker Jim Johnson responded, "Her mother and I do."

"Her mother", was Jim's wife, Vivian. Together, Jim and Vivian helped Kathy develop from an angry withdrawn child, to a beautiful, confident, Christian leader.

Ashely was growing up too fast . . . and her parents didn't know how to handle it. They wanted to treat her like a child; she wanted adult freedoms. When their constant clashing came to blows, they knew they needed help.

Through the family clarification program at Mills Home, both Ashley and her parents learned the roles they played in the family conflict, and how to listen, forgive and adjust in the future.

conflict, and how to listen, forgive and adjust in the future. "We're very grateful to Baptist Children's Homes," said Ashley's mother, Victoria. "I don't know what would have happened to Ashley. I've had friends say to me, 'I never knew there was a place like that.'"

Well, there is a place like that.

Thank God.

Baptist Children's Homes in 1992-93 served 1,453 children and their families through programs of intentionalized services at 13 facilities across North Carolina

Those facilities include four residential care campuses; seven emergency care homes; two homes for behaviorally troubled girls; therapeutic camping for boys; a maternity home; a home for teen-age mothers and their babies and a model daycare facility.

Baptist Churches, through the Thanksgiving Offering, Cooperative Program and direct gifts funded about one-third of BCH's \$10 million budget. A significant source of income continues to be from estate gifts from those who remember children in their wills.

BCH's model daycare service took a giant step June 27 when the new \$1 million, 10,000 square feet Fleshman-Pratt Early Childhood Education Center was dedicated. It will accommodate 75 infants, toddlers and two-year olds. During dedication, Robin Britt, N.C. Secretary of the NC Department of Human Resources, said BCH is "a true model of how young children can be shaped, nurtured and loved," and that "we will be looking at institutions like the Fleshman-Pratt Early Childhood Education Center as we find models to replicate."

T. Winfield Blackwell, president of the Fleshman-Pratt Foundation, whose lead gift started construction of the building, said, "Think how many children will be raised and shaped by the dedicated staff who serve here, and surely a goodly number will be developed, not only to be good citizens, but active ministers in God's service."

BCH also dedicated a counselor's lodge at Cameron Boys Camp; completed a strategic planning cycle for the next three years; celebrated the 50th anniversary of Odum Home in Pembroke; completed a three-year partnership with the Baptist Children's Homes of Sao Paulo, Brazil; and produced a new video about BCH, available August 15.

Swelling with emotion at the dedication of her new building, Daycare Services Director Mary Lou Dickey promised, "we will not fail" those who trust BCH with their children.

Michael C. Blackwell, who celebrated his 10th anniversary as president of BCH July 1, echoes that promise. "Baptist Children's Homes has been a cutting-edge ministry for North Carolina Baptists since 1885. As a disintegrating society moves the edges further and further, we're honing our ministry sharper and sharper. Thank you, North Carolina Baptists, for your support."

NC BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

Founded in 1922, Baptist Hospital is a missionary enterprise of the Baptist churches of North Carolina. The essence of our purpose is to carry out a ministry of healing as taught by Jesus Christ. We remain as fully committed to this mission as were our founding fathers. In the midst of changing health-care norms, we have not, nor will we, deviate from this mission. The following paragraphs report, not only basic facts, but various results of how we have sought in the last year to remain true to our heritage while providing quality health care at affordable prices.

Providers and Recipients of Healing

Our healing team now consists of 5,852 employees. The Medical Center (NCBH and BGSM) personnel total employment is fast approaching 9,000 people making us the second largest employer in Forsyth County. In our 806-bed facility, we had 23,247 inpatient admissions. Our Outpatient Department, physicians' clinics, and other related departments received 490,667 patient visits.

Our chaplaincy division joined with our health-care professionals to provide spiritual and emotional healing. With 15-40 chaplains present at various times, 52,934 ministries were provided to patients, families, staff and groups.

A new department of our Pastoral Care program named the Center for Congregational Health was given birth. Its purpose is to (1) train Intentional Interim pastors; (2) train church leaders; (3) provide a minister's assessment program; (4) establish a Minister's Help Line providing an opportunity for church leaders to receive guidance via a telephone call. The Pastoral Counseling Division opened a new counseling center in Wilmington bringing out total counseling centers to 11 across the state. The centers provided 16,205 counseling sessions.

Points of Excellence

(1) The Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations ranks Baptist Hospital in the top 9% of all hospitals in the nation.

(2) We performed our first pancreas transplant and first double organ transplant (pancreas and kidney) this year.

(3) We are one of only 26 comprehensive cancer care centers in the nation, treating more cancer patients than any hospital from Baltimore, Md. to Atlanta, Ga.

(4) Quality infant through adolescence care in our Brenner Children's Hospital.

(5) Our neonatal transport team is the largest in North Carolina and one of the 10 largest in the U.S.

(6) Our Level I (highest awarded) Trauma Center has 2,100 admissions a year.

In the midst of escalating health-care costs, we have a proven record of excellent stewardship.

(1) The latest report of the North Carolina Database Commission comparing hospital major services charges vs. Baptist Hospital reveals, for our most frequent diagnoses:

Duke - 36% higher

Carolina's Medical Center (Charlotte) - 36.5% higher UNC-Chapel Hill - 28% higher

Average statewide - 9% higher

(2) We are one of only 17 similar hospitals nationally with a "AA" bond credit rating.

(3) Averaging the last two years and the projection for 1993, the Consumer Price Index will average 3.9% and the Medical CPI will average 9.7%. Baptist Hospital charge increases for the same period will average 3.3%, well under both the above mentioned indexes.

Expansion for Meeting the Needs of the Future

Nursing Center at Oak Summit

Opening in July, this 170-bed facility provides skilled and intermediate care. The center will be one of only a few in the state to provide care for ventilator-dependent patients.

Emergency Department/Dietary

Under construction at the present time to be completed by June 1995, this facility will total 750,000 square feet. Our current ER was designed to handle 29,000 patients annually, but it is handling 40,000. Our new ER capacity will be 70,000 annually. This building will also house three floors of patient private rooms, our Pharmacy Department, and a 35-bed Day Hospital, new kitchen and cafeteria.

J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging and Rehabilitation

Construction on this facility begins in November of 1993 and is scheduled for completion in January 1996. It will include geriatric care, research, and education; psychiatry; and also provide comprehensive acute rehabilitation services including nutritional assessment, physical, outpatient, speech, and recreational therapy.

Baptist Benevolent Care Fund

Last year Baptists across our state gave \$422,000 to our annual Mother's Day Offering. All of these monies went toward relieving the financial burden of scores of former patients who have little or no health-care insurance and no financial means to pay their hospital bills. The churches and individuals help make this ministry possible and we are grateful. In conclusion, it is readily seen that this healing ministry we share together says to our patients and their families: "We care about your health-care needs, your spiritual and emotional needs, and your financial burdens, and we express our caring through service."

GENERAL BOARD REPORT

On December 31, 1993, I will complete a four year term as a General Board member of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina. I thank God for the rewards of this learning experience which has given me a greater appreciation for the work of our Lord through NC Baptist. For four years I have served on the Business Management Committee and as the chairman of that committee during 1993. The General Board conducts the business of the statewide convention in all matters except those specifically exempted by the constitution. There are three scheduled meetings annually of the General Board, the next and final meeting for this year is on September 28 and 29. Some highlights of activity in 1993 are as follows:

- 1. NC entered a cooperative partnership agreement with the state convention of New York.
- 2. Entered a three year partnership agreement with the European Country of Ukraine.
- 3. The state convention will vote in November regarding financial support to the Baptist Theological Seminary at Richmond, Virginia.
- 4. Gardner-Webb established a Divinity School.
- NC Baptist Men received and disbursed approximately \$785,000 for aid to Hurricane Andrew victims.
- The Mundo Vista property near Camp Caraway (Asheboro) was leased to the NC WMU for 49 years with an option to renew for another 49 years.

In North Carolina, overall giving (as shown in the table below) to the Cooperative Program is down 4% when compared to the same period during 1992. When compared to budget for 1993, our giving is 9.3% less than budget.

The table that follows gives a brief summary of selected items from the financial statements of the Baptist State Convention and shows the trend of giving by our NC churches through 8/15/93. The top half of the table deals with Cooperative Program giving only and the remainder of the table deals with all other giving that flows through the state convention.

NORTH CAROLINA MISSIONS REPORT

North Carolina Baptists have never faced a greater challenge for missions than is before us today. Over 2,000,000 people in North Carolina are unchurched. More than 50,000,000 people visit our resort areas every year, each one representing an opportunity to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Our state is becoming a haven for families who want to settle between the cold winters of the north and the hot summers of Florida. Many of these families are The number of people with special needs, such as unchurched. visually and hearing impaired and mentally handicapped, continues to grow. Our prisons are bulging with over 20,000 inmates. The multi-ethnic population of the state is growing faster than any other segment of our population. Already over 100,000 Hispanics The Asian segment of our population have settled in our state. will grow by over forty percent by the year 2000. Many of the multi-ethnics calling North Carolina home are without Christ as Lord and Savior.

Assisting churches and associations of the Baptist State Convention in reaching people for Christ and ministering to them is the task of the Mission Division. Our mandate comes from the Baptists of the state who hold missions up as a cornerstone of our Baptist Heritage. The Division organizes its work through its departments to meet the mission needs of the state.

Over 100 Southern Baptist Chaplains in the state are supported through the chaplaincy work of the division. New language missions are started in our language department and existing ones are continuously supported. We now have 97 language-mission churches in the state. People with hearing impairments are assisted through our deaf ministries. We have several deaf churches in the state. Our special ministries work also touches the lives of visually impaired and mentally handicapped people. Seminary extension courses are offered through over 100 training centers in the state. Bi-vocational ministers receive special assistance for their work. Eighty-four new mission-type churches were started in Anglo communities last year. Existing churches that are plateaued or declining receive special assistance for assessing current needs and projecting long-range possibilities. Multi-housing communities are touched through consultants who work across the state. The of Baptist Associations is strengthened through the work association development programs of the division. Through training Mission Development Councils, Baptists all over the state are discovered in that every Christian can be a missionary. Families in military communities experience the love of Christ through our military ministries.

"The fields are white unto harvest" . . . and the Mission Division of the Baptist State Convention seeks to point to the fields and lead Baptists in reaping the harvest. Your continued support through the Cooperative Program and the State Mission Offering is essential to achieving the vision Christ set before us.

The North Carolina Baptist Foundation works diligently in service to Christ as directed by the agency's Mission Statement:

"The North Carolina Baptist Foundation is an agency of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina committed under the guidance of the Holy Spirit to serving North Carolina Baptists and others in generating an increased awareness of Christian estate stewardship principals as a means of financially undergirding churches, institutions and mission endeavors on a permanent basis.

"And further, the Baptist Foundation Staff and Board of Directors are committed to being scrupulously moral, legal, efficient and accurate in carrying out the intent of each donor and trustor whose funds are placed under management of the Foundation as a means of sustaining a tangible and perpetual involvement in presenting the Gospel, meeting human needs and strengthening all bodies of Christian fellowship where Christ is the Head."

The total market value of the assets of the Foundation at the end of 1992 was \$41,880,638., an increase of almost \$5.6 million over the end of 1991. Typically, assets are either held as endowments paying interest income in perpetuity to named Baptist causes, or they are held in trust with current income being paid to individuals and future income to be paid to Baptist caused in perpetuity. Additionally, the Foundation offers fund management for Baptist causes on a revocable basis.

In 1992, and continuing into 1993, the Long Range Planning Committee of the Board of Directors met extensively to lay the groundwork for the Foundation's goals and objectives for the next five years. The previous five years were quite successful with ambitious financial goals being met early on. It is anticipated that the Board's work in evaluating the past and present status and in laying a road map for the future will result in exciting times ahead.

The staff of the Foundation consists of seven full time employees and two persons who provide part-time service in accounting and legal services. The office is located in Cary next to the Baptist State Convention building. Visitors are welcome and are encouraged to stop by for professional assistance or just to say hello.

BAPTIST RETIREMENT HOMES REPORT

1993: THE BEST OF TIMES

Did you know that:

In 1993, North Carolina reached place number ten (10) among all the states in the United States in regard to the size of its adult population over the age of sixty-five (65)?

That one-half of all the people who have ever lived to be sixty-five (65) are now living?

The fastest growing segment of North Carolina Baptist life is composed of those adults eighty-five (85) and older and that by the year 2000 that age category will double in size?

That by the year 1996 North Carolina's "Baby Boomers" will be turning fifty-five (55) every 18 seconds?

That by the year 2010 one cut of every two people living in North Carolina will be fifty (50) years of age or older?

What do figures like those above mean for North Carolina Baptists?

They point to the fact that one of the greatest needs facing our Convention as we move into the year 2000 is the provision of quality, affordable long-term care services to functionally impaired Older Adults through the expansion of existing long-term care facilities, and through the development of creative approaches to long-term care such as rural home health services, community day care programs, and respite programs for homebound care providers.

In an attempt to meet the above mentioned need, Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc. in 1993:

Opened the Rickman Nursing Care Center in Asheville, North Carolina (a 100 bed Medicaid certified nursing care facility). The Rickman Center is a state-of-the-art long-term care facility that has been developed to meet the needs of the poor elderly in Western North Carolina. (80% of the resident population will be recipients of benevolent funding.)

Renovated the Albemarle Baptist Home in Stanly Baptist Association and renamed it the Taylor House. The Taylor House has no financial requirements for admission and is designed to provide care to the assisted living level of care resident, regardless of his/her ability to pay for the long-term care services provided.

Developed a new addition to the Brookridge Health Care Unit in Winston-Salem in order to provide an area for small group work with residents suffering from dementia. This state-of-the-art program will enable Baptist Retirement Homes' staff to improve the quality of life experienced by members of its resident community who are mentally impaired.

Baptist Retirement Homes is keenly aware of the fact that without the support of North Carolina Baptists none of the above would have been possible. As a result of the prayers and funding that the "Homes" receives through the Cooperative Program and the North Carolina Offering For Older Adults, it has been able to offer hope to many Older Adults whose future would have been uncertain without the caring involvement of North Carolina Baptists. It is because of you that our institution has been able to make life for many Older Adults in 1993... The Best of Times.

CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE OF NC REPORT

Do you believe in miracles? They still cccur, and we experienced one in the 1993 session of the N. C. General Assembly. No gambling legislation was enacted during that legislative session.

When the legislators came to Raleigh on January 27, 1993, veteran legislature observers admitted that this was the year for a state-operated lottery bill to get out of the General Assembly. Both Governor James B. Hunt and Lt. Governor Dennis Wicker, both former lottery opponents, had endorsed the proposed lottery legislation. Furthermore, there were 42 new House members, and a large majority of them had campaigned supporting the lottery. Out of the key elected state officials, gambling opponents had only one friend, House Speaker Dan Blue, and he made no apologies about his opposition to state-sponsored gambling.

What happened? Concerned Christians began to speak up and contacted their legislators. By the time Senate Bill 11, The State Lottery Act, had passed the Senate by a vote of 27-23, House members who had campaigned supporting lottery legislation began contacting members of the House Committee on Constitutional Amendments and Referenda to keep the bill in committee.

In the meantime, some 20 workshops were conducted throughout the state educating and motivating the Christian community about this insidious evil under the sponsorship of the League, N.C. Baptist Men, Women's Missionary Union, the Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs, and the N.C. Christian Coalition. Resource leaders included Dr. Norman Geisler, author, GAMBLING A BAD BET; Dr. Patrick Anderson, Professor of Criminology, Florida Southern College; Dr. Paul Jones, Executive Director, Mississippi Christian Action Commission; Bill Brooks, Executive Director, CITIZENS AGAINST THE LOTTERY; from the Baptist State Convention, Doug Cole, Executive Director, Christian Life Council; along with George Reed, Director of Christian Citizenship; and members of Gamblers Anonymous.

In the closing days of the legislative session, Rep. David Redwine, (D-Brunswick), who has introduced lottery legislation for the past 10 years, requested that the bill be held over until the 1994 session.

Of course, this will give the \$300 billion gambling industry some 10 months to re-group their supporters. Also it will give concerned Christians the time to get their message to lawmakers that gambling is bad public policy, and such legislation ought to be defeated. There is also a pari-mutuel gambling proposal (horse racing with off-track betting parlors) before the General Assembly. The Senate Bill has already passed a Senate Committee and is currently in the Senate Finance Committee. The House Bill has also passed a House Committee and is currently in the House Appropriations Committee. Both bills are eligible for the 1994 session.

Someone has said, "The only lesson we learn from history is that we don't learn from history." North Carolina had an experience with pari-mutuel gambling with dog tracks in Currituck

and Carteret Counties in the 1950's. The N.C. Supreme Court closed them down as being a public nuisance. Perhaps there is no industry that is "riddled" with corruption

Perhaps there is no industry that is "riddled" with corruption as much as the gambling industry. Last year we had legislators indicted in S.C. for accepting bribes from gambling lobbyists. Some 10 public officials have pled guilty to corruption charged in Kentucky over a gambling "scam", and 12 others are under investigation. In Arizona, legislators have gone to prison due to a gambling scandal. We have had Governors from West Virginia and from Maryland to go to prison due to gambling scandals in their respective states. Wherever you have legalized gambling, undoubtedly, you will find corruption in government.

This is why it is urgent for committed Christians to contact their legislators and urge them to oppose any gambling proposals.

DRUNK DRIVING: When you deal with politicians, tenacity is a key. For ten years, we have sought legislation that would establish .08 breathalyzer reading as the standard for drunk driving in North Carolina. In the past, we were able to get such legislation through the House, but the Senate was the graveyard. The measure would always be referred to a hostile Senate Committee composed largely of trial lawyers, and that would be "death" to such a proposal.

With a change in Senate leadership, the .08 breathalyzer legislation will become law on October 1, 1993, which will be a useful tool in helping to remove drunk drivers from the highways.

The League continues to assist local communities in combating our No. 1 drug problem, alcohol. Let us know if a liquor referendum is to be held in your area, and we will be ready to help.

Joe S. Lennon, President Coy C. Privette, Executive Director The American Bible Society (ABS) is a group to which many of our churches and members give. These gifts assist in Scripture translation and distribution. In cooperation with the United Bible Societies (UBS) around the globe, the ABS can touch lives in the various language groups here and abroad. The ABS thanks Southern Baptist Churches for contributions totalling \$180,310. in 1992.

The focus in 1992 for the ABS has been to provide Hope - hope that comes through the good news of the gospel of Christ. "I long for you to rescue me! Your word is my only hope." (Romans 15:4) Often, when people have everything else taken from them, whether through personal suffering caused by illness, disease, or natural disaster, the only thing they have to cling to is hope.

Last year, through your efforts, the ABS helped distribute more than 84 million Scriptures here in the United States. Working with cur international partners of the UBS and ABS helped distribute hundreds of millions more. Complete books of the Bible have been published in at least 2,009 different languages and dialects. Each person who received these Scriptures was given hope through life-changing, hope-producing Word of God. With our help we become a hope-maker. We help the ABS provide Hope at a time of great urgency in the lives of people. Our help through the ABS makes available the Scriptures, the source of HOPE!

During 1992, the ABS was faced with many unexpected challenges. Following the racial violence that erupted in south central Los Angeles in April, the ABS, through thousands of volunteers, helped the nation reach across age-old barriers and forge new relationships through the sharing of a specially compiled 16 page booklet of Scripture passages entitled "Love Your Neighbor." The Scriptures selected focused on the issues of peace and justice and the healing power of God's Love.

During August, the ABS teamed up with the Salvation Army to provide the comfort of God's Word to the victims of hurricane Andrew, which wrecked devastation on the southern part of Florida and Louisiana. A total of 110,620 Scriptures, including 50,000 Bibles and New Testaments, was shared along with meals provided by the Salvation Army's mobile kitchens. Other Scriptures were distributed through volunteers working out of local churches throughout the disaster area. The Military Chaplain's Task Force, operating out of Miami International Airport, also shared ABS Bibles with the general population as well as with military personnel.

The ABS continued throughout 1992 to develop Scripture products to meet individual needs. One day while riding in a Chicago taxicab, Dr. Claude Frasier, an allergist and author from Asheville, North Carolina, caught a vision of how to deliver the Word of God to people of all faiths and all walks of life. It was as simple as a taxi ride. Dr. Frasier noted, "People can be reached for Christ simply by having His message available in the idle moments of riding in a taxicab." As a result, the ABS shared more than 50,000 Special Scripture leaflets through a national taxicab ministry supported by the Special Ministries Department of the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board.

The distribution task of the American Bible Society, however, reaches far beyond the borders of the United States. In a bold new move, the American Bible Society, in 1992, pledged \$100,000,000. for Bible work around the world over the next four years. More than \$23,000,000. of this fund will support the work of Bible Societies in central and eastern Europe and the former Soviet Union. This part of the world is at a critical time in its history and we believe that the Word of God can make a massive difference. The time is now to help share in that task!

In Cuba, as more and more people started attending church seeking to understand more about God, the need for Bibles escalated dramatically. One pastor explained that during an 18 month period, the church had received over 300 Bibles but needed more. "The Bible is our work instrument and we need more and more Bibles because there are more and more people asking for them." When pressed about who was asking for Bibles the pastor answered, "Nearly everyone is looking for a Bible including the well-educated - professionals, engineers, and teachers."

In Thailand, many hundreds of letters are received each week by the Bible Society and other mission organizations working in Thailand asking for Bibles. During 1992, Christians working for education authorities in Thailand obtained official permission to distribute Scriptures to elementary students in the state schools. More than 300,000 copies of a Selection featuring the story of the prodigal son and 2,000,000 notebooks containing Scripture passages were given to students in 427 schools in Bangkok.

In Africa, unconvinced by the slow progress of peace talks and with reports of fighting continuing in pasts of Mozambique, many residents of the country continued to flee their homeland and find shelter in refugee camps along the Mozambique-Malawi border. There is much spiritual hunger among the people in these camps and reports disclose a significant spiritual growth among the refugees due to the Bibles and Scriptures they received. With your help the American Bible Society distributed Scriptures to the US military in Somalia in their Operation Restore Hope. In Rwanda, where our own Miss Martha Colwell serves as a Southern Baptist Foreign Missionary, 87,648 Scriptures were made possible through donor gifts to the ABS.

Donor gifts to the American Bible Society made possible the following distribution of Scriptures throughout the world in 1992:
