Duties Suggested for Parish Missionary Correspondents

3. Write to missionaries without expecting an answer in return.
4. See that prayers are said for these missionaries at church services and auxiliary meetings. Encourage your members to pray for them in their private devotions.
5. Give the rector of your church news items about missionaries and ask him to announce them at church services.
6. Write to Church Missions House, 281 Fourth Avenue, New York City, and ask for material concerning openings for work in the mission field; the training necessary to fill such jobs, and scholarships available in case an applicant cannot finance this training. Use this material for a program or a full report at an auxiliary meeting. Pass it on to your young people for them to use in Church School or Young People's Service League.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Bishop Penick, reverend clergy, visitors and members of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of North Carolina. This year in which I have served as your President has seen such great changes in the life of our people that it seems much longer than twelve months since we met together in Tarboro. At that time our country had been at war for almost six months but we had not begun to suffer the derangement of our personal lives which has come increasingly upon us. Today as we meet together in Raleigh our bodies are disciplined by many material restrictions which the war has brought, but much more important than that, our souls have been and are being disciplined and tried by separation from loved ones. The thoughts of many here today will wander I am sure from time to time to far away places, be it Africa or Australia or the seven seas. Some of our members have suffered the loss of a loved one in the armed services and for them our hearts yearn and our prayers are offered.

During this period of change and trial how has our Auxiliary

fared? Have we advanced, held our ground, or retreated? My answer to this must be based on your reports to me and to your Diocesan Officers, and on my contacts with you at District Meetings and through your letters. If our basis of judgment is to be on the low level of quantity I can report a ten per cent increase in membership. No new branches have been organized during the past year but those that were organized since 1941 are growing in membership and in knowledge of Auxiliary work. There is room for genuine service to the Auxiliary and thus to the church, however, if some of the older established and strong Branches would lend leaders to instruct the younger and smaller groups in the work of the Auxiliary. On the financial side in a year that has confronted us with appeals from our country and our Allies both voluntary and compulsory, our Auxiliary members have still shown their faith in the cause we serve by not only meeting our Budget of \$7400 but giving \$684 above it plus specials to the amount of \$822.55, and an increase in the United Thank Offering.

Attendance at our Annual Conference at Vade Mecum last summer was the largest on record, and at District Meetings attendance was astonishing and enthusiasm and serious interest in our responsibilities as Churchwomen were marked.

I have attended one meeting of each District this year, both the Spring and Fall meetings of two districts. I directed the Conference at Vade Mecum, and have planned this year's Conference with the help of Miss Rosalie Wilson. I led one section of the Institute held at Christ Church, Cleveland, last June, attended the Adult Conference at Kanuga and the meeting of the executive committee of the Kanuga conferences; also several meetings of the Diocesan Council and the Diocesan departments of Christian Education and of Promotion. As your representative I was present at the meeting of the Provincial Woman's Auxiliary at the Synod in Birmingham, Alabama, in November. It will always be a matter of regret to me that I could not accept any invitations to visit the individual Branches, but I have tried to keep in touch with you by my monthly letters. In everything that I have done I have had the most loyal support and cooperation of the Executive Board, especially of your secretary, Mrs. John Huddle. Your past president assured me that this would be the case, but neither she nor I realized how great would be my need. During the last four months in particular there has been more than the cooperation of efficient and faithful co-workers. I have had a very definite feeling of support that I can ascribe only to their love and prayers. Nor has the kindness and understanding been on the part of the Board only. The Bishop has been a never failing source of wisdom and encouragement. I thank you all from my heart for your devotion to the Auxiliary and to me personally which has carried us through this difficult separation.

In her address to you at our Annual Meeting last year your president stated that in her opinion our greatest weaknesses are failure to interest all the women in the Auxiliary and failure to devote time and thought to Christian Education. It is significant that your reports to me in answer to the question "What do you consider your weakness" almost without exception deal with these two points . . . not enough Church women are Auxiliary women . . . lack of Christian education. A third weakness often stated is lack of leadership especially in smaller Branches. I make bold to say that no Auxiliary in our Church has had more helpful guidance in Christian education than we have had in this Diocese for the

past three years. Perhaps one reason we fail to study more is that we are all busy doing things and have little time left for reflection . . . still less for meditation and prayer. Yet we know that the basis of all our Christian life is knowledge of God's word, companionship with Him in prayer and at the Holy Communion. We feel the urgency, in these days, of post-war planning and our responsibility as Christians to offer the right solution. Obviously we cannot in our brief study periods evolve political and economic theories based on Christian teaching . . . what we can do individually and as a group is to learn to know better the Life of Christ. Looking at that perfect Life we shall see clearly our own sins as individuals and as a nation in all their unloveliness. On fire with the conviction and understanding of God's great Love for mankind we shall have no difficulty in winning members for our Auxiliary or in carrying on all phases of our work for the extension of his Kingdom. When we know better what it means to be a Christian we shall have a measuring stick by which to appraise all social and political issues on which as Christians we must take our position.

Who is he that overcometh the world but he that believeth that Jesus is the Son of God? And this is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith.

Miss Grimes made a motion, which was seconded and carried, that the meeting accept the Executive Board's recommendation for the expenditure of the balance of money in the budget in the following ways:

The president introduced Rev. Harvey Simmonds of Cape Mount, Liberia who addressed the meeting on his missionary work.

The convention gave a rising vote of thanks to the retiring officers.

The meeting was declared adjourned for luncheon, served by the Methodist women at the Edenton Street Methodist Church.

The afternoon session began at 2:15.

The president reported the findings of a committee from the Executive Board appointed to study the question of uniformity in the time of the elections of Officers in all Branches. The recommendation of the Committee is that the Branches elect officers to take office in April.

Mrs. Clarkson, chairman of the Resolutions committee reported that no resolutions were to be voted on.

Mrs. Pembroke Nash reported for the Findings and Courtesy committee.

The minutes were read, corrected and approved.

Noon Day prayers were offered by Rev. Ed Jeffress.

Bishop Penick gave his message to the convention.

The new officers were installed by Bishop Penick.

Mrs. Holmes handed the gavel to Mrs. Peoples, the incoming president, and Mrs. Peoples declared the 61st Annual Meeting to be adjourned.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINDINGS AND COURTESY

The sixty-first Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary has mirrored a change in the lives of the women gathered at Good Shepherd Church. Whereas, the plea last year was that we not neglect our church work for the new responsibilities of war work, this year there has been no need for such a reminder. The work of Christ is paramount in the lives of men and women. It presents the only answer to the problems of war, and a post-war world.

Our president, Mrs. U. T. Holmes, emphasized the need for renewed interest and enthusiasm in the work of the Auxiliary. "Our bodies are being disciplined by restrictions and our souls tried by loss and separation." She reviewed the year's work, stating that no new auxiliaries had been formed, but that the membership has increased ten per cent. She urged a more earnest study of the Scriptures. Miss Constance Young was commended for the splendid strides made by the Negro District.

Mrs. E. G. Peoples, Chairman of Christian Education, emphasized the importance of a program of study in order to develop a plan of action.

Reverend Harvey Simmonds of Cape Mount, Liberia, expressed his gratitude for the gifts and prayers of the Woman's Auxiliary. He presented vividly the need for trained workers to fill the recent vacancies.

Miss Sara Cheshire reported the excellent work being done by the Church among students at State College.

We were privileged to have Miss Alpha Nash, member from the Province of Sewanee to the National Executive Board, who spoke to us about the meeting of the Board from which she had just come. "God's Gift and Our Task" is to be the keynote of the approaching Triennial, she told us.

At the evening service, the Reverend W. C. Campbell, National Director of the Presiding Bishop's Committee on Laymen's Work inspired us "to put on the whole armor of God," and to have sincerity, love, and courage in preparation for the task that lies ahead.

Miss Lillie Hill, our Diocesan Missionary, gave a graphic picture of her twenty-nine years work at St. Andrew's Mission, and told how the war had affected her work.

Reverend Rufus Womble, from Roxboro and Camp Butner, told of the work of the civilian chaplains, which is a vital part of the Church's program today.

"Peace be unto you" were the opening words of Bishop Penick's address—not a negative but a positive peace. Our faith should remain firm, for God has surrounded us with physical evidences which bear testimony to the living and resurrected Christ. Just as Jesus breathed on His disciples imbuing them with the Holy Spirit, God breathed on Man, and a new spirit entered into him.

We are grateful to Mr. Dick and to the ladies of the Hospitality

committee and to the hostesses for the warm welcome and generous hospitality under difficult war-time conditions. Our appreciation also goes to the ladies of the Edenton Street Methodist Church for the enjoyable luncheon.

The two day session sends us home filled with enthusiasm and renewed zeal for our work for the Master.

If you have, you are already thanking Him by helping others in His name. "Freely ye have received; freely give."

You will be interested to know that for '41 and '42 our offering with interest is \$16,091.15. Let us see that every woman in our Diocese has a chance to know of this offering and to take part in it.

Do any of you know a little book called "Wings of Healing?" From it comes this "Note on Thanksgiving."

"The psychology of thanksgiving is a most revealing study. Not only does thanksgiving register our gratitude for benefits received. It touches springs of receptivity in the soul and releases new powers of helpfulness. Thanksgiving passes into thanksgiving."

These notes are followed by John Oxenham's "A Little Te Deum of the Commonplace," which I bring to you:

With hearts responsive
And enfranchised eyes,
We thank Thee, Lord, . . .

For all things beautiful, and good, and true,
For all things that seemed not good yet turned to good;
For all the sweet compulsions of Thy will
That chased, and tried, and wrought us to Thy shape;
For things unnumbered that we take of right,
And value first when first they are withheld;
For light and air; sweet sense of sound and smell;
For ears to hear the heavenly harmonies;
For eyes to see the unseen in the seen;
For vision of The Worker in the work;
For hearts to apprehend Thee everywhere;
We thank Thee, Lord!

REPORT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION CHAIRMAN

THROUGH A PRAYER OF STUDY

TO

A PLAN OF ACTION

During the present Triennium we have been trying to qualify as "Witnesses to the Power of God." In 1941, "Witnessing through Service," was our goal and our special fields of study were China and the Migrants. It is interesting to note how much both have been in the news of the day ever since. In 1942, we were called to, "Witness through Worship," and study a Christian Imperative and Christian Roots of Democracy in America.

This year, as our vision increases and our horizon broadens we are called to, "Witness through Evangelism."

Most of our study and thinking center around the planning of the Bases of a Just and Durable Peace and we know the only way this will ever be accomplished will be on the firm foundation of the Christian Family, Justice in Race Relations and really being, "Good Neighbors," to the world.

For three years then, we have been moving through a program of study toward a plan of action. What is this plan of action to which our Presiding Bishop through his Ten Year Forward in Service plan, is challenging us?

The answer is printed in italics on the cover of a new pamphlet, "Seek Ye First the Kingdom of God and His Righteousness." What does this mean to us today? I think our task today is not so different from what Jesus conceived His to be when He rose in the Synagogue at Nazareth and read from the books of the prophet Esaias: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me to preach the Gospel to the poor; He hath sent me to heal the broken-hearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised, to preach the acceptable year of the Lord."

Does this sound very different from the statement of the United Council of Church Women in A Call to Christian Women?

"At this time of the world's greatest tragedy we still believe, individually and collectively, that God reigns and that ultimately His will will prevail. In deep penitence for our share in the world's guilt and woe, we call upon the women of the Church to enter into the suffering and sacrifices of the human family, To combat the rising tide of hatred caused by war; To minister to those suffering from the ravages of war; To maintain and strengthen the Christian fellowship; To show friendship and understanding to the men and women in service for the defense of our country; To maintain the integrity of the home; To continue to its fullest degree the on-going ministry of the Church, even to the uttermost parts of the earth; To consecrate ourselves to the task of building a democracy at home which recognizes individual worth and strives for justice to all the people;

Finally to dedicate ourselves and our country to the task of helping to build a durable peace in a new world order based on love and justice.

I pray God we may have a "Task Force," equal to the task.

For this task of seeking and building the Kingdom of God we must have leaders, and this problem of real leadership is a tremendous one. Is it easy to find them? Think over the organizations to which you have served on a nominating committee. You know it is not easy. It should not be so difficult, and would not if we could all real-

ize that every task well done gives one some training for leadership. Quoting from an article on leadership training by Miss Charlotte Tompkins, "Leadership training begins when one says, 'Yes, I will,' to the question, 'Will you do this?'"

Why is there, among us, such a dread of responsibility? It is a very serious thing, and is not confined to those among the lowly. Only recently in the Congress of the United States there was one who advocated our participation in plans for peace, "Without Commitments," and was it not this same selfish fear of responsibility which kept us from taking our rightful place among the League of Nations twenty-five years ago, and with what dire consequences.

The International Council of Religious Education has a little bulletin called, "The Price of Being a Leader," in which Erwin L. Shaver has written, "It means the consecration of a definite share of our energy, of our time, and of our best thinking. It means that we must actually give our personal selves to this task to a degree and in a manner which no other vocation or avocation demands, for at the heart of Christian character building is fellowship. It means that many other things will have to be given up. It truly means heroism—always a heroism of the commonplace—for somehow this sort of work is classed with those values which are intangible; but occasionally, if we rise to our highest levels, a heroism like that of many pioneers and prophets. It means above all and at its best the deepest humility; we must redeem the term, "Leadership" to denote that humble devotion to service which Jesus gave as the diamond rule of life. It means that church workers must have the will to learn and grow young along with their pupils. It means that they must, to the degree to which they value their high calling as Christian workers, undergo a definite program of training in order to be workmen that need not be ashamed."

This opportunity your Diocese offers you at Vade Mecum, your province offers you at Sewanee and Kanuga and your parish offers you every time you are requested to serve in any capacity. This will be my last message to you as your chairman of Christian Education and this is the thought I'd like to leave with you, quoted from the leaflet previously mentioned,

"The only question which remains is: 'Are you able?'. Are you willing to pay the price of being a leader in the service of the Master Teacher?"

"'Are ye able,' still the Master
Whispers down Eternity,
And heroic spirits answer,
Now as then in Galilee:

"'Lord, we are able,'
Our spirits are thine.
Remold them, make us,
Like Thee, divine.
Thy guiding radiance
Above us shall be
A beacon to God,
To love and loyalty."

REPORT OF THE CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS CHAIRMAN

The reports from the Parish Christian Social Relations Chairmen for 1942 indicate that the increased demand made on the women of the church due to the war, are being absorbed without any appreciable neglect of the regular activities of the Auxiliaries.

There appears a growing interest in the work being done in hospitals and I am sure every one who participates will agree that this field of Social Service is very appealing and the results gratifying. Caring for the sick and helpless made up a large part of Christ's ministry to His people.

Practically all of the Auxiliaries are carrying on some type of work with soldiers. These contacts are very interesting, but it must be remembered that the homely, shy, unattractive boys in uniform are probably more lonely and homesick than the boys you might choose from a group to entertain or have in your home. Our program for the soldier must constantly be changed or dropped altogether if the need no longer exists, but never discontinued because the work is hard and first enthusiasm has waned. We cannot be too critical of what the boys in uniform do unless we have done everything within our power to substitute good, wholesome entertainment and surroundings for evil influences that are always on the alert.

This department is so broad in its functions, that I shall not attempt to mention the various types of work in which the women are taking an active interest.

It is obvious that a careful, well-planned program, with economy of time, effort and finances in mind, is even more necessary now than in peace time. The opportunities for service are unlimited and these opportunities must be used to give ourselves more fully and freely to Christ's work in friendship with His people, to enlarge our Christian relationship, and to extend His Kingdom.

There exists today a marked increase in juvenile unrest and delinquency. We must constantly be aware of the strain and perplexities our young people are experiencing and help them make the necessary adjustments with deeper conviction of what is right and what is wrong.

Constant study is required not only to cope with our local problems facing us each day, but to be aware of what we must face in the days to come.

May the work of this department be performed intelligently and earnestly. Anything short of our very best should not be satisfactory to us in our efforts to carry on the work of Jesus Christ Our Lord, for the good of all mankind.

REPORT OF THE SUPPLY DEPARTMENT CHAIRMAN

This is the first chance I have had to thank you for selecting me as Chairman of the Supply Department, I feel that this is a great privilege and honor to serve in this good work, and hope that I will be able to carry on the work as my predecessor, Miss Gant, has done. I am no speaker, but hope to show my appreciation of the honor by deeds more adequate than any words can express.

We have all been engaged in war work the past year, but even this extra work has not lessened our interest in our Missions.

Last fall we sent checks to our two Personals, one to Rev. Henry James McGhee of Tunica, Miss., and his wife. Quoting from his letter—"It is impossible for us to express our deep appreciation to you and all the others concerned for your generosity and kindness. Mrs. McGhee has gone up to Memphis to do her shopping, and I am sure she will get an abundant amount of pleasure out of this, as she always does. I will do the same thing a little later." A check was also sent to Rev. James MacKensie, Mullen, Nebraska, who wrote a very appreciative letter. I think we all prefer buying our own clothes rather than have them bought and sent to us.

Our two Mission Allotments this year are: Miss Hattie Price, Good Shepherd Mission (Rocky Bar), Elkton, Va. She is doing a splendid work in this mountain Mission. She writes that her day begins at 6:30 in the morning and by nine o'clock I am ready to start out to do the work alone, since my two companions, two little girls I reared in the Mission House, married and left me. I have pictures of this Mission which I will show at our meeting this afternoon.

Our other Mission is the Fort Valley College Center, Fort Valley, Ga., the Rev. J. Henry Brown is in charge. This is a Mission school for negro boys and girls. From all the data I have received Rev. Brown is certainly doing an outstanding work among these young people. They are trained in all kinds of vocations which will fit them to be good citizens. We are glad to be of some help to these boys and girls.

We have sent off several boxes of second-hand clothes to both Miss Price at Good Shepherd, and Rev. Brown at Fort Valley College Center. Also allotments of new clothes which have been so beautifully made by the different branches of the Auxiliary. I am sure that the children who wear them will be thankful for their Auxiliary friends. The negro branch of St. Ambrose, Raleigh, should be mentioned for their garments which they made and sent in.

I would like to mention another outstanding work done by the District of Mecklenburg, under the leadership of Mrs. Dichtenmueler. They sent in around 300 garments. Two hundred were made by the Auxiliary members. Before sending they had an exhibit of the garments which must have made a very good showing.

We have also sent several boxes of clothing to our own Miss Lillie Hill. She writes that they have helped her so much in her work. We have also sent clothes to other Missions in the State. I feel that we have done a good work this year, but not enough and I hope we can do more next year.

The Program Meeting, which comes in January, is a problem to

have something new and interesting. This year we did have a little play put on by some of the branches, I believe Erwin, Burlington and Thomasville did use this play. I have not heard if any others had it or not. The play is called the "Missionary Barrel," and was written by a member of St. Philip's Church, Mrs. J. T. Cobb. I think it is very good and we put it on in Durham at one time.

About sixty branches have paid their pledges. Miss Gant turned over to me last spring \$623.62. After paying for all material, garments bought which could not be made, two Personal checks, postage and freight, I have on hand \$624.07.

What will be our report next year, will it be better? I am sure with all the things we have to be thankful for, we will be willing to give more of what we have to help others and more of our time to this worthy cause.

I want to thank each and everyone for the cooperation and help they have given me this year. This work was new to me and I needed so much help. Thanks again and with God's blessing.

REPORT OF THE INTERRACIAL COMMITTEE

The report which follows was read by Miss Emma Hall, Chairman of the Interracial Committee. She prefaced the reading with the announcement that Theodosia Hall is giving up the work of the Diocesan Church Worker to become associated with the work of the Good Samaritan Hospital. Someone will soon be found to continue the work for the Negro District.

Report of the Diocesan Church Worker for the Negro District

To the Rt. Reverend Edwin A. Penick, Bishop of the Diocese of North Carolina and the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese, I wish to make this report, which terminates to a certain extent my activities as the Negro Social Service Worker for this diocese.

It was during the early spring that I was approached as to my desire and willingness to take a position in the Good Samaritan Hospital where it was felt that I might be of some help and at the same time render some Christian Social Service. The Bishop of the Diocese was approached and also all the members of the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary and it seemed that it met with their approval. I began work with the job the first of April.

I wish to express to all concerned my sincere appreciation for the opportunity to serve and to help prove that a worker, especially in smaller churches, is really worthwhile. Of course the field in which I have worked is, I think, the largest church in our diocese. But there are other churches in which I have been privileged to serve that a work like the one I have been trying to pursue, would be a godsend.

In the two years and five months which I have been privileged to serve, I would not have you think that it has been an easy job, I did not expect that when I began it. There were difficulties and trials and there have been times and incidents which made us glad and made us feel that our efforts were worthwhile. From time to time I have attempted to give you some idea of what I was doing. Of course there is nothing material that you can touch and see,

but I do pray that some of the seed which I have attempted to plant will bring forth good fruit for the future of my race and the community in which I have worked.

Especially do I wish to thank Miss Emma J. Hall and the good members of St. Peter's Auxiliaries and St. Martin's Auxiliaries all of Charlotte for their interest and encouragement. They have done much to make it possible for me to carry on.

I would say in closing that I still have my interest in the community, and the church and I do find so many opportunities in my contacts with the patients in the hospital to render Christian Social Service.

I wish to again thank every one who has contributed to the support and encouragement of the work and to ask that I may have your sincere prayers wherever I may be and in whatever work I may find myself.

REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY CORRESPONDENT

The Department of Missionary Correspondents is growing in a conception of what it can mean in the life of our Diocese. Its aim is to inspire understanding and love of the missionary work of the Church by methods that appeal most to the average person—by personal contacts with the missionaries themselves. Through this love and through knowledge and prayer we can hope to have a share in bringing recruits to the mission field and lend our support to their efforts to train themselves for their task.

There are at present openings in the home mission field for teachers and trained nurses. For the time being few workers can be sent to foreign fields because of the war but there are workers now being trained in order to go out as soon as the way is open. There is still a need for two graduate nurses for Alaska, a matron for an Alaskan hospital, a teacher for a girl's school in Liberia, and a nurse for the same field, and for a woman with religious education training for work in the Virgin Islands. Parish correspondents should present these needs to their branches and be ready to help potential volunteers with information obtainable from the Church Mission House.

This department is in a state of development and you will see it improve in methods and grow in activity under my successor. Some district correspondents report little increased interest that they can see, others find a great deal more. The Negro District particularly shows an awakening interest in this work.

Since the National Headquarters has discontinued the plan of assigning a Prayer Partner to each district of a Diocese, and wishes us to assume responsibility in personal ways for the missionaries who go out from our Diocese, it seems wise for us to conform to a Nation-wide plan and concentrate our efforts on this group of missionaries instead of on a single Prayer Partner Missionary for each district. Those branches who have become closely attached to a Prayer Partner of long standing, may choose to continue independently their happy association with her, in addition to their part in the Missionary Correspondents Plan for their district.

The Executive Board has approved this change of plan to conform to the national plan. Therefore the term Prayer Partner becomes obsolete and in its place we have the Missionary Correspondent in Diocese, District, and Parish.

The letters from our Missionaries are a challenge to our own zeal in the spread of the Kingdom and it is our desire to continue steadfast in prayer for them and their work.

It has been gratifying to learn that many have had well planned programs being carried on during the year. Responses to requests and letters answered have surpassed many other years we have known. There were evidences that annual reports went in more nearly on time with greater efforts to meet obligations. A complete statement of our financial status is not available here but the Chairman was gratified to have the Diocesan Treasurer write, "I have never seen such interest shown." Central Fund, according to last information, was \$17.50 paid representing only 6 branches. This must be improved.

The district U. T. O. custodian reported, in January, \$167.26 representing 14 branches; many paid much more than in some years previous. Notwithstanding, some branches showing splendid reports with local activities, failed to see the importance of sharing with others in the Mission fields. Remember how He said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." Those who share will find their own pails fuller—try it.

Each chairman of departments has exhibited unusual concern about their duties—desiring to have the departments function properly.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be, "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

ARTICLE II

Object

The object of this organization shall be to help in carrying out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church: Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service.

ARTICLE III

Membership

The membership of this organization shall be composed of all Parish and Mission Branches within the Diocese.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: A President, a Vice President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of Christian Education, a Secretary of Christian Social Relations, a Secretary of Supply, a Custodian of United Thank Offering.

Section 2. These officers with the District Chairman shall constitute the Executive Board and shall meet at least twice a year at the call of the President.

ARTICLE V

Duties of Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for. She shall also preside at meetings, and at every Annual Meeting shall address the Auxiliary. She shall make a report to the Diocesan Convention.

Section 2. The Vice President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have specific duties to be decided in conference with the President.

Section 3. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist the President in preparing and having printed the Annual Report, and at each Annual Meeting shall make a report.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering and Box Work money, and shall make a report of same to the Annual Meeting. At the end of every fiscal year, the Treasurer's accounts shall be verified by a public auditor. The Treasurer's report, as audited, shall be published in

the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Section 5. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Education shall promote and stimulate educational work in the branches of the Diocese by every means in her power, and carry out the program of the National Department of Religious Education.

Section 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Relations shall co-operate with the Christian Social Relations Departments of the Diocese and the National Council, in the promotion of their plans and programs.

Section 7. The Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in the Spring and Fall of each year, and shall remit immediately for investment to the Treasurer of the National Council.

Section 8. The Secretary of Supply shall have charge of the work of the Supply Department.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. All Diocesan officers shall be elected for a term of three years, the president to be elected at the second Annual Meeting after the Triennial, and to take office at the close of the third Annual Meeting after the Triennial.

Section 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President for one year.

ARTICLE VII

Districts

Section 1. For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into districts.

Section 2. A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman duly elected by her District for a term of three years. In case of vacancy the Vice-Chairman shall serve as Chairman.

Section 3. Each District shall hold at least one and, if possible, two meetings a year.

ARTICLE VIII

Election of Diocesan Officers

Section 1. Prior to the Annual Meeting, the President shall appoint from the Executive Board a nominating committee of three who shall consider proposed nominees to fill the elective offices at the Meeting, and from the names suggested or considered the Committee shall recommend to the Meeting the nominees for such offices. The consent of the nominees shall be obtained by the Committee before making the recommendation. Nominations may be made from the floor of the Meeting by any delegate provided the consent of the nominees has been first obtained. A majority vote shall be required for all elections. In case there are more than two nominees for the same office and no candidate receives a majority vote, the name receiving the smallest number of votes shall be dropped from the ballot.

Section 2. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund for the Calendar Year preceding the meeting.

ARTICLE IX**Finance**

The Executive Committee in consultation with the Bishop shall prepare a budget for the year. The budget shall be presented to the branches for their support at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Section 2. From the total amount pledged towards the budget, one-half shall apply to the work of the National Council, one-half to the work of the Diocese.

Section 3. The United Thank Offering and contributions for the Supply Department shall be in addition to the payments on the budget.

ARTICLE X**Amendments**

This Constitution may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present, provided a written copy of the proposed amendments has been filed with the Diocesan Secretary, and a notice of same mailed to each branch by the Secretary at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting.

BY-LAWS

The place and time of the Annual Meeting shall be approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

1. The order of Business for the Annual Meeting shall be arranged by the President and the Executive Committee.

2. Each Parish Branch having fifty members or less shall be represented by the Branch President and one other delegate (appointed by the President or elected by the Branch). The President, or her representative, and the delegates each has a vote. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the Branch to an additional delegate with power to vote.

3. Each Branch shall be assessed twenty-five cents per member to provide for Provincial Expenses, printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of Speakers, and other items necessary for the proper administration of this organization. This shall be known as the Central Fund.

4. One-fourth of the Branches having the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at the Annual Meeting. Five members shall constitute a quorum at the Executive Committee Meetings.

5. The Diocesan President shall appoint at the beginning of her second year of office the following Chairmen, to serve for three years: Chairman of Church Periodical Club; Inter-racial Chairman; Legislative Chairman; Missionary Correspondent; Chairman of Young People's Work.

6. The District Officers shall correspond to the Diocesan Officers and shall be elected at the first meeting of the District after the Diocesan Annual Meeting.

The District Chairman shall appoint the following Chairmen, to serve for three years: (1) Church Periodical Club; (2) Prayer Partnership Correspondent; (3) Young People's Work.

7. Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be the authority in all questions of Parliamentary law not covered by these By-Laws.

8. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates at any Annual Meeting.

DUTIES SUGGESTED FOR PARISH MISSIONARY CORRESPONDENTS

5. Give the rector of your church news items about missionaries and ask him to announce them at church services.
6. Write to Church Missions House, 281 Fourth Avenue, New York City, and ask for material concerning openings for work in the mission field; the training necessary to fill such jobs, and scholarships available in case an applicant cannot finance this training. Use this material for a program or a full report at an auxiliary meeting. Pass it on to your young people for them to use in Church School or Young People's Service League.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

President's address to the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of North Carolina, assembled at St. Paul's Church, Winston-Salem, N. C., April 18, 1944.

Bishop Penick, Reverend Clergy, visitors and members of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of North Carolina.

We have come together in this, our sixty second Annual Meeting to consider God's Gift and Our Task. It is significant that the service of worship in which we have just participated is called, An Act of Assurance. In this day of "Men's hearts failing them for fear and for looking after those things which are coming on the earth", we need assurance, assurance of the goodness, love, purpose, and power of God, and confidence in the ultimate victory, which cometh from God.

We who have had the responsibility of planning the program for this meeting, have hopes that we shall receive here a new vision of God's Gift and a new strength for Our Task.

The thing that has struck me most forcefully during this, my first year as President, is the difference in peoples' responses. The same thing will be true of this meeting. There will be some seed sown here which will fall by the wayside, some upon stony places, some among thorns, also, please God, there will be other which falls into good ground and brings forth fruit, some an hundredfold. Let us look to our responses!

As Stephen Bayne, in his, Gifts of The Spirit says: "We must mean it when we say we want to know more about God's will for us and His provision for us. We must be expectant that He asks great things, heroic things from us and His Church, and we must be ready to do His will as He gives us light to know it."

All of these different kinds of responses added together have made a good year in the life of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina.

The faithfulness and efficiency of your officers, and the generosity of your response have made this possible. One new branch of an established auxiliary, and two new auxiliaries have been added to our membership

I have tried to keep in very close touch with each branch through monthly letters in which I have undertaken to set forth the details of, "Our work for the extension of His Kingdom". It was my great pleasure to attend all nine of the District Meetings last fall, and to be encouraged both by reports of accomplishments and attendance, as well as by the enthusiasm of our women. I attended the Adult Conference at Kanuga, directed the Woman's Auxiliary Conference at Vade Mecum, assisted in the Rural Institutes, and have been present at meetings of the Diocesan Executive Council, the Kanuga Board of Managers, the Department of Christian Education, and the Board of Managers of the Thompson Orphanage.

I have conducted one three day institute on the Woman's Auxiliary and have been pleased to accept nearly every invitation extended to speak at parish meetings. The high light of the year was, of course, the General Convention held in Cleveland last October, about which you have heard in detail, but I cannot refrain from again stating what a joy it is to

realize oneself a part of so great a whole as the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, it being a vital part of Christ's body—The Church. There in Cleveland we saw for ourselves the quality of our leaders and rejoiced. There we felt ourselves truly united in a great fellowship of worship, study and work.

In making plans for our work in the future, let us consider carefully the closing paragraph in the report of the Executive Secretary, made at the Triennial.

"In review it seems clear that in spite of demands upon women as citizens and the emotional strains of wartime separation of families, the state of Women's work in the Church today, so far as it can be judged from reports and observation is encouraging; judged, that is, by the standard of past performance. Judged in the light of the opportunities for service and the need for leadership; measured by the purpose of God for His Church and the potential power of His followers we cannot be content. So long as we are reaching only a small fraction of the women of the Church, not to mention the unchurched; so long as there is one woman who thinks of the Church in less than world terms; so long as we make study a substitute for action or action a substitute for thinking or both study and action a substitute for worship, we cannot rest upon our achievements. It seems clear to your staff that as we look ahead we must be diligent in season and out in our effort to plumb the depths of meaning for the service we offer, to think in terms of purposes, that our action, whether it be sewing or serving of tables, effecting reforms by influencing legislation, or giving volunteer service in our communities may reflect our Christian conviction."

What is our Christian conviction? It was well stated in the Bishop's Pastoral Letter, read by our own Bishop at the last General Convention.

"In the development of His creative purpose, God uses our human co-operation. So also he places upon those who are redeemed the responsibility of helping to extend the benefits of redemption to all mankind". . . . "Our faith in the invincible Christ, whom hatreds of the world could not, and cannot defeat, provides us with the assurance that we too may become more than conquerors through the power of Him who died, and rose again."

In the confidence given by this assurance, may each woman be found ready to do her part to help bring to pass that to which our Presiding Bishop has called us,

"Through world Evangelism to, World fellowship in Christ."

Mrs. W. S. Holmes gave her report on Christian Education.

Mrs. V. K. Hart reported on Christian Social Relations; Mrs. W. R. Kuker for the Supply Department and Mrs. R. H. Lewis for the United Thank Offering.

The Diocesan Treasurer, Mrs. R. H. Bouigny, gave a splendid report including in it a statement of the appropriations made by the Executive Board of the balance on hand at the close of 1943. She moved that the appropriations so made by accepted by the meeting; motion seconded by Miss Lillie Hill and carried.

Mrs. W. S. Holmes moved that the Treasurer's report be adopted; seconded by Mrs. V. K. Hart; carried.

At this point Mrs. Francis Clarkson raised the question as to whether the meeting had the authority to apportion the balance without consideration of the law which provides that equal parts of the budget money go to the work inside and outside of the Diocese respectively. Mrs. Peoples referred this matter to the Credentials Committee for consideration and adjustment.

Mrs. Bouigny then told the meeting of the decision of the Executive Board to raise our budget to \$8000 for the coming year. She moved that this be accepted; it was seconded by Mrs. Landon Hill and carried.

The budget was not itemized at the Executive board meeting and the president asked that we have the consent of the meeting authorizing the board to do this. Mrs. Lewis moved that this be done and it was seconded by Miss Wright and carried.

The secretary read a letter from Mrs. F. S. Spruill of Rocky Mount expressing her interest in the meeting and enclosing a check for twenty-five dollars to be spent as the assembly saw fit. The president then said that the check would be added to the offering to be presented at the evening service; said offering to go to the Presiding Bishop's fund for World Relief.

The president recognized three former presidents of the Auxiliary: Miss Emma Hall, Mrs. W. J. Gordan, Mrs. W. S. Holmes.

Mrs. Peoples spoke of the opportunity and joy we had in store for the afternoon session in hearing Dr. D. A. McGregor, Executive Secretary of the National Council's Division of Christian Education.

The meeting wished to send greetings and thanks to Mrs. Spruill and the secretary was instructed to do so.

Noon-Day prayers were offered by the Rev. A. S. Lawrence, Jr., of Walnut Cove.

The Credentials Committee reported a quorum present.

The Nominating Committee presented the name of Mrs. Peter Hairston of Mocksville for United Thank Offering Custodian and that of Mrs. John W. Huddle of Chapel Hill for our choice as representative to the Diocesan Council. Mrs. Peoples asked us to think carefully about these nominations during the noon hour and be prepared to vote at the afternoon session.

At this point, Mrs. Peoples introduced Miss Anne Groff, missionary nurse from Shanghai, China, who gave a splendid address on the work and experiences of her co-workers and herself in that war-torn section of the world.

The meeting was declared adjourned for luncheon which was served by the ladies of St. Paul's Church in the Parish House.

AFTERNOON SESSION

At the opening of the afternoon session at 2:15, the president called for nominations from the floor for the two officers to be elected. There were none. Mrs. Hill moved that the secretary be instructed to cast the ballot for Mrs. Peter Hairston for United Thank Offering Custodian and Mrs. John W. Huddle for our choice as representative to the Diocesan council; motion seconded by Mrs. Kuker; carried.

Here Mrs. Peoples expressed thanks for herself and the entire meeting to Mrs. Lewis for her splendid work as the outgoing United Thank Offering custodian and also to Mrs. Mackie as representative to the Executive Council. A rising vote of thanks was given.

The following amendment to the Constitution was presented:

Article VI; Section 1; "All Diocesan officers shall be elected for a term of three years. The Treasurer and the United Thank Offering Custodian to be elected at the first annual meeting after the Triennial; the President, Secretary of Supply, and Secretary of Christian Social Relations to be elected at the second annual meeting after the Triennial; the President to take office at the third annual meeting after the Triennial; Vice-President and Secretary of Christian Education to be elected at the third annual meeting after the Triennial.

Section 2; The Secretary shall be appointed by the President."

Mrs. Clarkson moved that it be accepted; seconded by Mrs. Gregory; carried.

The election of delegates to the Provincial Synod to meet in Nashville, Tenn., on Oct. 17-18 and 19 at Christ Church was then in order.

Mrs. Landon Hill moved that the four names receiving the highest number of votes be elected; the next four as alternates; seconded by Mrs. Griffith; carried.

WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION

The morning session opened with prayers by the Rev. James S. Cox, rector of St. Paul's.

Reports of District chairmen were called for and handed in.

The president urged that all material for the new Year Book be sent in immediately in order that it might be published early in June.

Miss Lillie Hill made an announcement about the Penn-Carolina conference in Rockingham County, the purpose of which is to prepare young people for evangelistic work.

The minutes of the Tuesday session were read, corrected and approved.

Mrs. Peter Hairston of Mocksville and Mrs. Ethel Louise Byerly Simmonds were recognized.

Mrs. Peoples spoke also for a former president of the Auxiliary, Mrs. U. T. Holmes, saying that a letter had been received from her expressing her love and interest in the meeting.

The secretary read a letter from Miss Groff expressing her grateful thanks for the kindness shown her and also for the gift of \$50.

Mrs. J. W. Drake of Wilson extended an invitation to the Auxiliary to meet in St. Timothy's Church, Wilson, next year. It was accepted.

Mrs. R. H. Lewis announced that the United Thank Offering from "the women of the church" of the Diocese of North Carolina for the spring ingathering amounted to \$5793.38. She asked that all women in the church make sure that they have a blue box.

Mrs. Meekins, reporting for the Resolutions committee, offered the following resolution, made by Mrs. Harry Winkler and Mrs. Francis Clark-son of Charlotte:—

"Be it resolved; that a fund be provided in the Diocesan budget to defray at least a part of the expenses of delegates to the Provincial meeting."

The chairman of the resolutions committee, Mrs. Meekins, moved that the resolution be adopted; seconded by Mrs. Drake; carried.

A second resolution was offered,—That our Bishop be asked to speak to us on the opening day of the convention when more members should be present. Some discussion followed and it was decided to allow the program to remain as it has been, the Bishop giving us his inspiring message at the close of the meeting.

The president expressed her appreciation of all that had been done to make this such a wonderful meeting; that she considered it a privilege to hold her first meeting in Winston-Salem where all had been so well prepared for us. She said we had all come to "catch a vision of the Kingdom for our Task." She bade us "look to our responses."

Mrs. Gordon called attention to two publications; a book on the work going on in free China—The Anking News Letter; and The Alaskan Churchman, published four times a year; price \$1.

Miss Hall asked that the secretary send greetings of the Annual Meeting to every missionary in the field and she was instructed so to do.

A Round Table discussion on The Diocese of North Carolina in Action, followed in the Parish House, led by the Bishop.

St. Mary's College, Raleigh, was represented by Miss Adelaide Winslow. Miss Billy Cherry spoke in behalf of St. Mary's House, Greensboro.

Mrs. M. D. Whisnant told the meeting of the work going on at the Thompson Orphanage.

The Rev. R. J. Johnson presented the work of the Negroes in the Diocese.

Rural Institutes was discussed by the Rev. C. E. B. Robinson of Cooleemee.

Youth work was presented by the Rev. Grey Temple of Rocky Mount.

The Rev. A. S. Lawrence, Jr., presented Vade Mecum.

Each speaker was allotted seven minutes with three minutes for questions from the floor.

At this point, Mrs. Peoples announced that the offering taken at the Tuesday evening service amounted to \$168.73.

The report of the Findings and Courtesy committee was given by Mrs. Roger Gant and was most inclusive.

The minutes for the day were read and approved.

The assembly adjourned to the Church for noon-day prayers and the Bishop's message. At the close of his address, he asked all present to repeat with him "We accept our Task."

Mrs. Peter Hairston of Mocksville was installed as United Thank Offering Custodian for the next three years.

REPORT OF UNITED THANK OFFERING CUSTODIAN 1943

The first words of my report are very familiar to all of you:—"It is said that the United Thank Offering started because of the divine discontent of one young church woman. That woman, Mrs. Richard H. Soule, was called upon to help count the offering of 500 delegates at the 1886 Triennial in Chicago. It amounted to \$82.71." Mrs. Soule was amazed to find it so small. In a spirited letter to the church papers, Mrs. Soule set forth the vital financial needs of our women missionaries, suggested that the offering be made an annual one, and that the objects to be aided by the offering be selected and made known before the time of the next meeting in 1889. From then on through her long life she traveled and spoke and worked and gave for the offering. That young church woman, Mrs. Richard H. Soule was 95 years old on February 17th of this year. On her birthday she received congratulatory letters from churchmen and friends in many lands. A month later on March 21st she died in her home on Beacon Street in Boston.

"May eternal light shine upon her."

That first United Offering in 1889 amounted to a little over \$2000.00. In 1943 the last United Thank Offering taken in Cleveland was \$1,119,878.91. Of this sum the women of the Church in the Diocese of North Carolina gave \$25,350.00. Of this \$9,145.95 was gathered in during the year 1943.

Mrs. Soule's first thought was of an *offering*, but later it was decided to call it a *United Offering*, and in 1919 in recognition of its true character as a thank offering a resolution was passed making the title "The United Thank Offering of the Women of the Church." Notice *that*,—not women of the Auxiliary, but women of the *Church*." And so it stands today an offering from every woman of our Church, expressing to God thankfulness for his gifts. Through the years has come the knowledge that, like the quality of mercy "It is twice blest; it blesseth him that gives and him that takes." It blesses the giver for "Nothing carries us into the presence of God more swiftly than the lifting power of a heart overflowing with thanksgiving." It blesses him who takes, and you may find just who is to be blessed by this last offering by reading the budget which you may get from 281. As you know we share now in the support of all women missionaries and also in their appointment.

Then it seems to me it must be a blessing to those who have the privilege of spending this large sum. From the last report of the meeting of the National Executive Board I take this:—

United Thank Offering: The following grants were voted:—

Deaconess Peppers, travel and typewriter to enable her to continue her work among the relocated Japanese—\$150.00.

Miss Beauchamp, Arizona, travel—\$100.00.

To repair Horner Hall, Appalachian School, Penland, N. C.—\$400.00.

Then followed others. Because you were thankful and gave, the National Board found it possible to make these grants.

At the same meeting it was decided to change the size and quality (and I hope the color) of the United Thank Offering boxes when the

material on hand has been used, and also to change the theme on the box to "Let us give thanks unto our Lord God"

Tomorrow morning we will place on the altar, here, our first of the six offerings which will go to the Triennial when it meets in San Francisco in 1946. God grant the whole be used to help rebuild a world at peace.

REPORT OF CHAIRMAN CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

It has been my privilege to serve as your Educational Secretary during a year that has held many challenges to those seeking to know more about the life that our Lord came to give. We have been confronted by destruction and death in all corners of the earth and yet we look for life as we seek to increase His Kingdom, for we have His promises. We realize the need for knowledge and guidance as never before.

Christian Education has been defined as the process by which a soul develops in appreciation of the things of Christ. It must be the underlying principle of all our work done in His Name. It is the keystone in the arch, without which our building falls apart.

In this first year of a new Triennium, we took for our keynote *God's Gift and Our Task*. Yea, we, in convention assembled, accepted our task, of letting ourselves be used to bring in fully *God's Gift of His Kingdom*. To this end our thoughts were directed as we tried to interpret our task, *For All of Life*, in our Mission Study. We endeavored to find our obligation to this nation of diverse peoples *We Who Are America*. As contrasted with the conception of man as merely an integer in the mass, we tried to understand *The Christian Doctrine of Man*. Since we know ourselves to be children of God, we have tried to learn how to pray to *Our Father in Heaven*. And, since our citizenship is also of this world, we have studied *This Created World* from the standpoint of a Christian teacher.

Through your reports, I learn that you have done a good year's work but there are still not a great many Bible classes and there are too few Parish Councils. Leaders are being developed and, right here, let me recommend *A Guide for the Self Training of Leaders of Women's Work*, procurable from "281."

One district Educational Secretary mapped out a fine course of reading for her members. Another one conducted an institute during Lent. The Auxiliaries in one parish felt enough concern about Christian post-war planning to let their Congressman know how they stood on the subject. Several branches reported having done their mission study in union with other churches. This is most desirable.

I am going to say something about money; and, lest I seem to encroach on the treasurer's grounds, let me call attention to a resolution passed at the Triennial Meeting. It concerns Proportionate Giving and is to the effect that "a study of it be incorporated into the program for this triennium." So it does belong in this department.

We must find what the Bible teaches and then see how we measure up to the standards. Read and ponder the Offertory Sentences. One from the book, Tobit, charges, "If thou hast much, give plenteously; if

little do thy diligence gladly to give of that little." In Deuteronomy 16:17 we read, "Every man shall give as he is able according to the blessing of the Lord thy God which He hath given thee." St. Paul admonishes us: "Upon the first day of the week, let everyone of you lay by him in store, as God hath prospered him." These all enjoin orderly, systematic giving of our means. Some prefer to make a "separated portion" of their goods unto the Lord. Others accept the tithe as a minimum of giving, enlarged by "offerings." To these, the prophet Malachi puts these words into the mouth of the messenger of the Lord, "Bring all the tithes into the storehouse . . . and prove me . . . if I will not open you the windows of heaven and pour you out a blessing that there shall not be room enough to receive it."

I would refer you to *Women at Work*, one of the Forward in Service pamphlets, in which there is discussed *Women and the Use of Money*.

As we enter the second year of this Triennium, let us consider God's *Gift* of the Holy Spirit and determine our *Task* to be to let Him so illumine our lives that we may be the light of the world in our generation. Let us walk in the Light, as He is in the light, and so have fellowship one with another until, through World Evangelism, we have World Fellowship in Christ.

REPORT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS CHAIRMAN

The reports of the Christian Social Relations Chairmen for 1943 were excellent. A black and white record on Christian Social relations in any parish is difficult to compile, but from the facts given we can be very proud of the work that is being done in this department. However the beginning of a new year is a good time to take stock and I should like for each Chairman of Christian Social Relations in every parish to consider this question . . . What can this parish do to meet more effectively the religious and social needs of our community?

Creation of public opinion on the side of right social action is pre-eminently a task for Church people. If we are not willing to initiate reforms out of Christian motives we cannot blame others for failing to do so. We must at all times be aware of the necessity to extend our present program, supplement the activities of other groups and develop new activities. We must lend strength to all the agencies of the Church which are laboring for the happiness and welfare of all people, that they may find in our Master their salvation and peace.

The improvements for which we are all striving will only come about as we truly accept and faithfully act on the doctrine of the brotherhood of all men in our Lord.

I am sure that every parish in the diocese is doing something in the field of Christian Social Relations, but I am equally sure that none of us are doing all that we can do. In fact there is so much to be done that now as never before it is necessary to study, think clearly and see straight—

then act—remembering that action based on knowledge is the final test of our sincerity as Christians.

Conditions of the social world will change when we as church people and Christians do something about it.

May we strive to hear the call to harder thinking, broader vision, deeper consecration and greater sacrifice for the common good—over-riding our minor distinctions of race, nationality and economic class, and thru our efforts to aid in establishing a new order wherein the nations of the world may live together in trust and fellowship, in justice and peace.

REPORT OF SUPPLY DEPARTMENT CHAIRMAN

I want to begin my report quoting from a paragraph in the Supply Manual: "No matter how carefully assignments are carried out and reports made, something very important will have been missed if each assignment is not made the means of increasing the knowledge and interest of the women who participate in it." Unquote.

Recently, Miss Stabler our National Supply Secretary, prepared a Supply Manual, which contains all the information and instructions regarding the duties of the Supply Secretary, this Manual is just what we have needed. One was sent to each District Chairman and also one to each Branch Secretary. These are to be handed down to each new Secretary.

Last fall checks were sent to our Personals. One to Mrs. Robert Z. Johnston, widow, whose husband was Priest in charge, St. Cyprian's Church, St. Augustine, Fla. The other personal check was sent to Rev. Frank H. Davenport, White Bear Lake, Minn. Very appreciative letters were received from both of these.

Our two mission allotments this year are St. Matthews' Mission Penuelas, Puerto Rico. The Missionary Bishop of Puerto Rico, recommended providing for the needs of this mission by sending money. A check was sent to the National Treasurer and forwarded to Rev. Victor

Rivera, who is in charge of this mission. Our other allotment is the Rosebud Indian Mission, South Dakota, Rev. Paul H. Barbour in charge. My contact with Mrs. Barbour, who does all the writing, has been very pleasant. This allotment has been completed, sending ready made garments and a few being made by four Auxiliary Branches. We did not do very much sewing this year as material was very scarce. The few garments which were made were so large that they did not look as if they were for human beings. Mrs. Barbour writes, "the younger girls are reducing so they say. Fashion has struck them." When I first read this allotment and saw the request for 18 blankets, I did not know where I was going to secure these. One member of St. Philip's Church, Durham, wrote to a friend of his who is in the blanket manufacturing business, he sent us one dozen of practically new blankets in bright colors which always appeal to Indians. Then from the help of several Auxiliaries the eighteen were soon ready to be sent to South Dakota. We are certainly very grateful for this gift.

A number of boxes of second hand clothing have been sent to Rosebud Mission, and also to Miss Lillie Hill, and other missions in the State.

All branches have had their annual program meetings. Each branch planned their program and I understand that they were very interesting and I think they enjoyed doing the planning. Miss Lillie Hill was a big help to us, she told of her work at several of these meetings, also showing pictures.

Up to date sixty branches have paid their pledges. After paying for all garments bought, some material, postage, freight, two Personal Checks one allotment check, we have on hand \$585.29. Everything cost more this year.

I, again, want to thank each one for their help and cooperation which they have given me these two years. Be ready next fall to begin with the same energy and interest

As is everything else so with the Parish Secretaries, they are only a number now, so if you haven't received your number, will you not notify me? It was my privilege to attend the Triennial Meeting of the Church Periodical Club in Cleveland last fall when our National Officers were elected. Because of the crowded condition of "281" the C. P. C. office is now located at 61 Gramercy Park N., New York City. Truly the Church Periodical Club is one of God's great gifts and ours is the privilege to see this task well done!

REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY CORRESPONDENT

For the past year this department has conformed to the nation-wide policy by which each diocese assumes responsibility in personal ways for the missionaries from the diocese. Its aim is to inspire understanding and love of the missionary work of the church by methods that appeal most to the average person.

Two newsletters have been sent to each District Correspondent and to the missionaries themselves, and news of our missionaries has been published in "The North Carolina Churchman." Each district has assumed the responsibility of sending a Christmas gift to each of our diocesan fellow-workers at home and abroad.

An increasing number of letters from both domestic and foreign fields show a real appreciation of the interest being shown in the workers. Es-

pecially do they seem to enjoy receiving newsletters about their fellow-workers.

It is gratifying to note that some vacancies in the mission field have been filled since the last report of this department. The needs, however are still great. While it is impossible to send workers to the Far East at present, when the war is over the need for young women who might be interested in such service will be greater than ever. In the medical field there is always room for women doctors, nurses, and laboratory technicians. Teachers are needed for everything from kindergarten to college work. Perhaps the greatest need is for young women with teaching ability for religious work among women and children—"evangelistic workers". Parish correspondents should keep these needs before their branches and be ready to help potential volunteers with information obtainable from Church Missions House. Only through knowledge of these needs and through prayer can we hope to have a share in bringing recruits and lend our support to them.

Let us continue steadfast in our prayers for those who are now working and for those who, because of the war, are "ambassadors in bonds", for

"Away in foreign fields they wondered how
Their simple word had power—
At home the Christians two or three had met
To pray an hour.
Yes, we are always wondering, wondering how!
Because we do not see
Someone—perhaps unknown and far away—
On bended knee."

REPORT OF LEGISLATIVE CHAIRMAN

APRIL 1943-1944

Since the State of North Carolina holds its Legislative Session biannually, next year—1945—will be the first opportunity for the functioning of your legislative committee of the Woman's Auxiliary. We, the committee, wish to approach that important time of the making of new laws, and improvement of old,—with all the force of our fine body of Episcopal women solidly behind any movement for the betterment of the underprivileged, of those sick mentally and morally, and of the Youths of our State!

To render aid of real value, you should be prepared to raise your voices to the men of that Legislature coming from your own home towns. You should acquaint yourself with the real needs of North Carolina and possible proposals to rectify these. Public sentiment is a weight that cannot be ignored and this sentiment can be swayed by your own quiet persistence in your beliefs and hopes for better conditions in North Carolina.

Last year you passed a resolution to return to the State Legislative Council of Women's Organizations—after seeing the worthwhile causes for which they had successfully worked in 1943. Dr. Ellen Winston, their

fine leader, recently succeeded in office by Mrs. O. F. McCrary, expressed keen appreciation of this return saying that the Women of the Auxiliary could be of great help in promoting the Council's legislative Program in 1945.

The Program as approved by the executive committee—is now sent for the approval of the 14 organizations constituting the Council. I have condensed this Program for your convenience and here present these proposed Items and the reasons behind their presentation by the Council as proposed objectives.

Item I. Raise the compulsory school attendance age from 14 to 16 years and provide for its enforcement through the State Department of Public Instruction.

Because—All other states, with the exception of Georgia, Louisiana and Virginia set the age limit for compulsory school attendance at 16 years or more. Under the Child Labor Law in N. C. a child cannot work until 16, and yet he is allowed to leave school at 14. That gap causes illiteracy, truancy and juvenile delinquency.

Item II. Provide for improved public library service through further increase in State Aid for Public Libraries.

Because—we have far too few libraries—one half million North Carolinians do not have any library service available. Also we have far too few books in our libraries. National public library expenditure is forty-two cents per capita—we in North Carolina spend seventeen cents per capita!

Item III. Provide expanded facilities for the care and treatment of feeble-minded children of both races.

Because—There are approximately 2,700 mentally defective white children and Caswell Training School, our only institution for their care, is equipped for only 800! There is no training school at all for the 800 mentally defective Negro children. Such feeble-minded children are a problem to their homes and their communities. Instead of being allowed to become delinquent and even criminal, they might—if properly trained in childhood—even be able to earn their own livelihood!

Item IV. Make adequate provisions for modernizing the jail system and for bringing it up to minimum approved standards.

Because—At least 68 of all the county jails in North Carolina fail to meet the minimum standards set by the State Board of Health, State Board of Charities and Public Welfare, and Fire Marshal—in sanitation, feeding of inmates, segregation of the races and sexes, medical treatment, and protection from fire hazards. Yet these jails continue to house over five thousand white and colored women a year!

Item V. Provide for clinics for the control of cancer, with these clinics either to be set up under the State Board of Health or to be fitted into the program that will be worked out under the new commission appointed by the Governor.

Because—Cancer ranks second as a cause of death in North Carolina—and all time high in 1943 of 2,317 deaths from cancer in our State! There is at present no state wide program for the control of this disease and only one approved cancer clinic, Greensboro. It is a well-known medical fact that early diagnosis and treatment of cancer is the patients best chance

of cure. Clinics would save many women and men from this dread disease.

Item VI. Provide for a full-time supervisor of narcotic education in the State Department of Public Instruction.

Because—The most effective approach to the control of narcotics is through public education, to make more effective a full-time supervisor is needed.

Item VII. Obtain a State Minimum Wage Law.

Because—The need for such a floor for low-paid workers is generally recognized. Thirty-four states already have minimum wage laws.

We, the Legislative Committee, composed of myself Chairman, Mrs. Irving Hall of Raleigh, Mrs. V. K. Hart of Charlotte, and Mrs. E. G. Peoples—would like to ask your approval of any or all of these items. We would like to be able to pledge your support next year to this program of the Legislative Council. So will you please make some motion to this effect?

I would suggest that each auxiliary parish president either act with us herself, when necessary to stir up "our men folks" to interest in putting these measures before legislators—or appoint some carefully chosen woman of charm and sincerity whose influence would carry weight with outstanding men of her community.

STATE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

TENTATIVE LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM, 1945

This program was approved by the Executive Board and the Annual Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of North Carolina. (See Minutes of Annual Meeting, Page 23.)

The following legislative program was adopted by the membership of the State Legislative Council and approved by the Executive Committee for submission to the 14 organizations constituting the Council. The program includes seven items. Reasons for including each item are specified. Some of the items will require new legislation, introduced either by the Council directly or by another agency with the support of the Council. Others do not require legislation but involve increased appropriations. Final action on the legislative program for which the Council will work during the 1945 General Assembly will be taken at the regular Council meeting in the autumn. The final 1945 program will include those items from the seven submitted here which are indorsed by all of the member organizations.

Item I. Raise the compulsory school attendance age from 14 to 16 years and provide for its enforcement through the State Department of Public Instruction.

Because:

- A. North Carolina is the only state except Georgia and Louisiana having 14 years as the maximum for compulsory school attendance. With the exception of Virginia, which has 15 years, all other states set the age limit at 16 years or more.

- B. A child cannot work under the State Child Labor Law until he is 16 years of age without a special permit. This leaves a two-year gap between school and job.
- C. Truancy is a major cause of juvenile delinquency, and the rate of juvenile delinquency among 14 and 15 year old children is alarmingly high.
- D. North Carolina does not want to continue to produce illiterates. According to the 1940 census, 27,000 children in North Carolina, 7 to 13 years of age, inclusive, were not attending school.

Item II. Provide for improved public library service through further increase in State Aid for Public Libraries.

Because:

- A. Almost half a million North Carolinians are without public library service. Another million people have very limited service.
- B. The public libraries of North Carolina contain only one-third of a book per person. The standard set by the American Library Association is two books per person or six times the number of books in our public libraries.
- C. The national average for public library expenditure is 42 cents per capita. In North Carolina in 1942-43, the expenditure was only 17 cents per capita.

Item III. Provide expanded facilities for the care and treatment of feeble-minded children of both races.

Because:

- A. There are approximately 2,700 mentally defective white children and 800 mentally defective Negro children in North Carolina who need institutional care.
- B. Caswell Training School, our single institution for the mentally defective, is only equipped to care for 800 white children or less than one-third of the total needing care. There is no training school for mentally defective Negro children.
- C. Mentally defective children, left at large, are serious problems in their own homes and communities. They increase the number of juvenile delinquents.
- D. Many of the mentally defective children, both white and Negro, can be trained to earn a livelihood for themselves if given the proper training in childhood.

Item IV. Make adequate provisions for modernizing the jail system and for bringing it up to minimum approved standards.

Because:

- A. Many of our jails fail to meet the minimum standards set by the State Board of Health, State Board of Charities and Public Welfare, and Fire Marshal in sanitation, feeding of inmates, segregation of the races and sexes, medical treatment, and protection from fire hazards.
- B. Of the 100 county jails in North Carolina, only 18 are on the approved list of the Federal Bureau of Prisons. An additional 14 are

on the list for restricted use only. Yet, our 68 jails condemned by the Federal authorities continue to house North Carolina's prisoners.

- C. The wide variation in commitments indicates lack of standardization in jail procedure. In 1940, some counties committed no white women to jail. In contrast one county committed 9 out of every 1,000 white women 15 years of age and over to jail in the one year. By counties the rates of commitment in 1940 for Negro women ranged from 1.5 per 1,000 to 47.7 per 1,000.
- D. During 1940, an estimated 2,760 white women and 3,870 Negro women were committed to jail in North Carolina at least once; yet no provision is made for rehabilitative treatment.

Item V. Provide for clinics for the control of cancer with these clinics either to be set up under the State Board of Health/or to be fitted into the program that will be worked out under the new commission appointed by the Governor.

Because:

- A. Cancer ranks second as a cause of death in North Carolina. In 1943 there were 2,317 deaths from cancer alone, the highest number of cancer deaths on record.
- B. Cancer is particularly serious as a cause of illness and death among women.
- C. North Carolina has no state-wide program for the control of this disease and in fact has only one cancer clinic approved by the American College of Surgeons, namely at Greensboro.
- D. Early diagnosis and treatment of cancer are recognized by the medical profession as a cancer patient's best chance for a cure of the disease.

Item VI. Provide for a full-time supervisor of narcotics education in the State Department of Public Instruction.

Because:

- A. The most effective approach to the control of narcotics is through public education.
- B. To make more effective the present instruction in the public schools a full-time State supervisor is essential.

Item VII. Obtain a State Minimum Wage Law.

Because:

- A. The need for a floor under wages is generally recognized. Thirty-four States already have minimum wage laws.
- B. Employees of most manufacturing establishments and transportation companies are covered by the Federal law. Employees of mercantile establishments and service industries are entitled to the same protection through a State law.
- C. The law is not designated to raise wages. Its purpose is to maintain the present wage level for the lowest-paid workers.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINDINGS AND COURTESY

We find much to encourage us in this, the 62nd Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary. In spite of wartime difficulties, it has been well attended. The three new branches reported signify growth; and the action taken to increase our budget for 1945 from \$7,400.00 to \$8,000.00 also indicates a definite forward step. It was a satisfaction to know that the Treasury showed a balance of over \$1,100.00, after all obligations had been met and that part of these funds could be voted to special purposes. We are deeply grateful that the United Thank Offering Spring Ingathering shows an increase of about \$1,000.00 over last year.

Our keynote "God's Gift and Our Task", an echo of the Triennial Meeting, has been sounded in many tones; and over and over has recurred the thought that "the Christian world must proceed from world evangelism to world fellowship in Christ."

Our President, Mrs. E. G. Peoples, in her message set before us high standards and noble aims. Reminding us of our responsibility as delegates to the Convention where inspiration will be so freely given us, she cautioned us to "look to our responses." She emphasized the thought that our "volunteer service in every field may reflect our Christian conviction, our faith in the invincible Christ whom hatreds of the world could not, and cannot defeat."

Mrs. W. S. Holmes, Chairman of the Department of Christian Education, stressed the need for letting Christ, the Light of the world, so illuminate our lives that we may be the light of the world in our generation.

Reporting on Christian Social Relations, Mrs. V. K. Hart gave us this fine thought: "that action based upon knowledge is the final test of our sincerity as Christians."

Mrs. W. R. Kuker, of the Supply Department, emphasized that "something very important will have been missed, if each assignment is not made the means of increasing the knowledge and interest of the women who participate in it."

Mrs. R. H. Lewis, as United Thank Offering Custodian, reminded us that it is "a Thank Offering from the Women of the Church", and not from Auxiliary members only.

Miss Constance Young presented the work of the Negro district which was full of encouragement and stressed the increase of work in the nineteen branches. She urged us to "accept our task."

Miss Anne Groff of Shanghai, China, who recently returned to the United States aboard the Gripsholm gave us a most interesting resume of conditions in Shanghai from 1937 to 1941. The most encouraging thought is that Christianity has brought to the Chinese people a spiritual freedom. The influence of the Christians in China is out of all proportion to their numbers.

Dr. D. A. McGregor, Executive Secretary of the National Council's Division of Christian Education, showed us clearly that education is a fine art. He portrayed the position of a woman in the home as analogous to woman's position in the "family of God, the household of faith." Reliability, love, encouragement, good housekeeping, weaving the pattern

of family life and broadening men's minds," are the qualities and duties we must project into the family life of the Church.

At the evening service Dr. McGregor vividly described the Kingdom of God flowing as a stream full of "warmth, drive and direction," stemming from Christ. This is His gift to us; and our task is, first to recognize the "difference between the life of the Kingdom and the life of the world," second, "to give our faith and allegiance to God, and third, "to be thankful."

We wish to express the gratitude of the Assembly to the Rev. James S. Cox of St. Paul's Church, to all the ladies of the various committees in this Church, who so efficiently managed the many details of the Convention, including the two delicious meals in the Parish House and the beautiful arrangement of flowers throughout the Church and Parish House, to the officers and choir of the Church, to our many hostesses for their cordial and gracious hospitality. We return to our home parishes feeling that it was good to have been here, and filled with renewed enthusiasm and zeal for our work for the Master.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT OF GRANVILLE

The Rev. Ray Holder of Wadesboro, Mrs. John F. Heard of Atlanta, member of the Executive Board of Episcopal women, and Mrs. E. G. Peoples of Oxford, newly elected president of the Woman's Auxiliary of North Carolina, were the speakers at the Granville District Meeting held in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Ridgeway, Thursday, October 21, 1943.

Reviewing 'Missionary Opportunities Now Confronting the Church' Mrs. Heard said that the fastest growing diocese in the world is in India where the prerequisites for church membership include training and active participation in church work.

Mrs. Peoples urged that November 11, World Community Day of Prayer, be observed by every auxiliary member of the district. In reporting the recent meeting of the General Convention in Cleveand, Mrs. Peoples pointed out that unity of fellowship was emphasized by the fact that the secretary to the presiding officer of the Triennial was a Japanese girl, charming and efficient. Also that for the first time a negro layman spoke before the General Convention. The district appreciates the honor of having first claim on Mrs. Peoples.

The Rev. Ray Holder, representative from the Diocesan Department of Promotion, brought us an instructive message on the Church's Program. It was good news to the whole district to learn that he had accepted a call to Holy Innocents, Henderson.

We also welcomed to our district the Rev. and Mrs. Cobey of St. Paul's Louisburg.

Reports made by branch presidents showed that work of real value was being done, not only along accustomed channels, but also in meeting the needs of the present day crisis.

Reports of district Secretaries showed cooperation among the branches. Mrs. J. H. Brodie paid tribute to the late Rev. Isaac Wayne Hughes, rector of the Church of Holy Innocents, Henderson, for thirty four years, and to his service to the district, in impressive words of appreciation.

Sixty-six people were present at the meeting. Luncheon was served by the Ridgeway branch.

Henderson extended an invitation to the district for the 1944 meeting.

LETTER FROM PITTSBORO

Pittsboro, N. C., June 28, 1944

Dear Mrs. Peoples:

Thank you very much for your interesting letter which was read at our regular meeting.

Mrs. Peoples, in regard to the work of our Auxiliary in the past year to which you referred to in your letter, we did have a plan which we have tried to carry out, (plan of action). We encourage Christian Education. During Lent we had a Religious Book Reading Contest. Twenty books were read, including The Presiding Bishops Book for Lent, The Lord's Prayer (Book) and the outline of The Lords Prayer, also many very interesting books. The oldest member in the Auxiliary read the largest number of books, and she was presented a book, title, The Choice Before Us, by Dr. Stanley Jones, World Famous Missionary. During Lent we studied The Silent Billions Speak. An all day meeting was held at the home of one of our members, with a picnic lunch served at the noon hour.

Several of our members are unable to attend the meetings regularly, but we keep in touch with each one, they are always notified when and where each meeting will be held, and they are interested and cooperate in any way possible. Our auxiliary members have a widening range of interest in people and their welfare, near and far. CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be, "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

ARTICLE II

Object

The object of this organization shall be to help in carrying out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church. Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education and Christian Social Service.

ARTICLE III

Membership

The membership of this organization shall be composed of all Parish and Mission Branches within the Diocese.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: A President, a Vice President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of Christian Education, a Secretary of Christian Social Relations, a Secretary of Supply, a Custodian of United Thank Offering.

Section 2. These officers with the District Chairman shall constitute the Executive Board and shall meet at least twice a year at the call of the President.

ARTICLE V

Duties of Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for. She shall also preside at meetings, and at every Annual Meeting shall address the Auxiliary. She shall make a report to the Diocesan Convention.

Section 2. The Vice President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have specific duties to be decided in conference with the President.

Section 3. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist the President in preparing and having printed the Annual Report, and at each Annual Meeting shall make a report.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering and Box Work money, and shall make a report of same to the Annual Meeting. At the end of every fiscal year the Treasurer's accounts shall be verified by a public auditor. The Treasurer's re-

port, as audited, shall be published in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Section 5. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Education shall promote and stimulate educational work in the branches of the Diocese by every means in her power, and carry out the program of the National Department of Religious Education.

Section 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Relations shall co-operate with the Christian Social Relations Departments of the Diocese and the National Council, in the promotion of their plans and programs.

Section 7. The Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in the Spring and Fall of each year, and shall remit immediately for investment to the Treasurer of the National Council.

Section 8. The Secretary of Supply shall have charge of the work of the Supply Department.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. All Diocesan officers shall be elected for a term of three years. The Treasurer and the United Thank Offering Custodian to be elected at the first annual meeting after the Triennial; the President, Secretary of Supply, and Secretary of Christian Social Relations to be elected at the second annual meeting after the Triennial; the President to take office at the third annual meeting after the Triennial; Vice-President and Secretary of Christian Education to be elected at the third annual meeting after the Triennial.

Section 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President.

ARTICLE VII

Districts

Section 1. For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into districts.

Section 2. A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman duly elected by her District for a term of three years. In case of vacancy the Vice-Chairman shall serve as Chairman.

Section 3. Each District shall hold at least one and, if possible, two meetings a year.

ARTICLE VIII

Election of Diocesan Officers

Section 1. Prior to the Annual Meeting, the President shall appoint from the Executive Board a nominating committee of three who shall consider proposed nominees to fill the elective offices at the Meeting, and from the names suggested or considered the Committee shall recommend to the Meeting the nominees for such offices. The consent of the nominees shall be obtained by the Committee before making the recommendation. Nominations may be made from the floor of the Meeting by any delegate provided the consent of the nominee has been first obtained. A majority vote shall be

required for all elections. In case there are more than two nominees for the same office and no candidate receives a majority vote, the name receiving the smallest number of votes shall be dropped from the ballot.

Section 2. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund for Calendar Year preceding the meeting.

ARTICLE IX

Finance

The Executive Committee in consultation with the Bishop shall prepare a budget for the year. The budget shall be presented to the branches for their support at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Section 2. From the total amount pledged towards the budget, one-half shall apply to the work of the National Council, one-half to the work of the Diocese.

Section 3. The United Thank Offering and contributions for the Supply Department shall be in addition to the payments on the budget.

ARTICLE X

Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present, provided a written copy of the proposed amendments has been filed with the Diocesan Secretary, and a notice of same mailed to each branch by the Secretary at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting.

BY-LAWS

The place and time of the Annual Meeting shall be approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

1. The order of Business for the Annual Meeting shall be arranged by the President and the Executive Committee.

2. Each Parish Branch having fifty members or less shall be represented by the Branch President and one other delegate (appointed by the President or elected by the Branch). The President, or her representative, and the delegates each has a vote. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the Branch to an additional delegate with power to vote.

3. Each Branch shall be assessed twenty-five cents per member to provide for Provincial Expenses, printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of Speakers, and other items necessary for the proper administration of this organization. This shall be known as the Central Fund.

4. One-fourth of the Branches having the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at the Annual Meeting. Five members shall constitute a quorum at the Executive Committee Meetings.

5. The Diocesan President shall appoint at the beginning of her second year of office the following Chairmen, to serve for three years: Chairman of Church Periodical Club; Inter-racial Chairman; Legislative Chairman; Missionary Correspondent; Chairman of Young Peoples' Work.

6. The District Officers shall correspond to the Diocesan Officers and shall be elected at the first meeting of the District after the Diocesan Annual Meeting.

The District Chairman shall appoint the following Chairmen, to serve for three years: (1) Church Periodical Club; (2) Prayer Partnership Correspondent; (3) Young People's Work.

7. Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be the authority in all questions of Parliamentary law not covered by these By-Laws.

8. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates of any Annual Meeting.

THE PASTORAL STAFF

The fiftieth anniversary of Bishop Lyman's ordination to the Priesthood was observed by a special service in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Raleigh, on December 19, 1891. The principal speaker on this occasion was the Rev. Matthias M. Marshall, D. D., the rector of Christ Church, Raleigh, and also President of the Standing Committee. At the end of his address, he presented to Bishop Lyman a Crozier or Pastoral Staff as an emblem of the authority of the Episcopal office, and also as a token of appreciation for Bishop Lyman's eighteen years of service in this Diocese. Dr. Marshall, referring to this gift of the clergy and laity of North Carolina said: "We would have it bear witness, after some sort, of our gratitude to God for the zeal and fidelity and abundant labors, in season and out of season, for the spiritual welfare of all the flock over which the Holy Ghost hath made you oversee that so conspicuously characterized all the years of your ministry in our midst."

This Staff is now the property of the Diocese and is used by the Bishop on special occasions of ceremony. The ebony shaft is surmounted by a silver shepherd's crook that is richly carved with Christian symbols. At the top of the shaft is a round ball adorned

with the Greek letters for Christ. It could signify the sufficiency of Christ for the whole world and reminds us of the words of St. John: "God so loved the world that he gave His only begotten Son." Above the world is a hexagon on four panels of which are the symbols of the Gospel, a Winged Man for St. Matthew, a Lion for St. Mark, an Ox for St. Luke and an Eagle for St. John, suggesting the superiority or dominance of the Word of God above all thought. The other two panels are (1) the Lamb of God, reminding us of the sacrifice of Christ for man's redemption, and (2) the Seal of the Diocese of North Carolina which might stand for the church. At the top, above all, is the Shepherd's Crook which represents the Divine Motive of the Incarnation, that is, the love of God, and His merciful care for each member of his flock, for "we are His people, and the sheep of His pasture."

In brief, the staff is God's protection, the point prods us towards our duty, the crook restrains us from evil, the world for Christ gives us vision, the Four Gospels furnish light, the Church is His family, His sacrifice redeems us, His overarching, sheltering Love is our life. These are some of the simple truths that are pictorially suggested by the Pastoral Staff of the Diocese of North Carolina.

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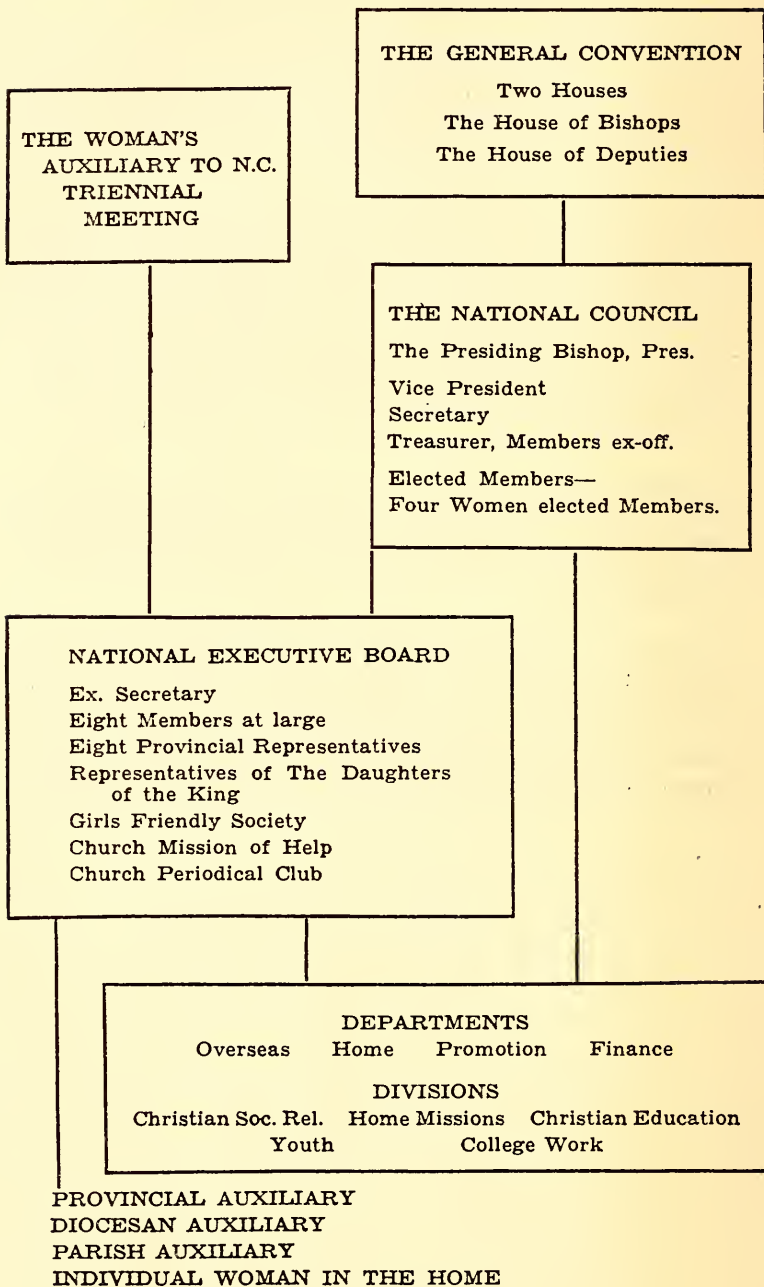

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT
OF THE
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY, DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA

The past year has been a time in which we've had to make many adjustments, both in our personal lives, and in the life of the Woman's Auxiliary. Some of these adjustments are a challenge to our ingenuity and cause us to find new ways of doing things, and not infrequently help us to realize what things are really important. Thus in adjusting our plans this year to the office of Defense Transportation ruling on Conventions, we've had to plan a different kind of meeting, and in selecting the key-note we've tried to emphasize what seems most important to the life of the Auxiliary—"Workers, together with Him." Let us resolve, then, to make up for our loss by good hard work, working with our great Ally.

We have tried during the past year to do what we could to promote both International and Interracial Understanding. Toward the former, many Auxiliaries have had study groups on the Dumbarton Oaks Conference, and we have communicated our interest to our U. S. Senator, the Hon. J. W. Bailey, and been assured that he is in favor of "this country joining in with other important nations in measures to preserve her peace." The next paragraph in Senator Bailey's letter seems to me somewhat contradictory and I am quoting it for your consideration, so that you may let him know what you think. "I am not in favor of merging this country into anything like a World Government I shall study all of the propositions with a view to the end above mentioned."* We also must continue to study and pray earnestly for the United Nations Conference to be held in San Francisco April 25, 1945.

Through our participation in the State Legislative Council we have had an active part in such social legislation as was passed in the recent legislature of our state. Dr. Ellen Winston, state superintendent of Public Welfare, reminded us that what was accomplished was only a step in the right direction, and further gains would require the cooperative effort of every woman. Study the full report of the Legislative Council in the new Year Book. It will tell in detail what was accomplished and give suggestions for our next move. The Council is anxious to have each member or organization send in suggestions for social legislation in which it is particularly interested.

We have also had study groups on Interracial Understanding, have given a scholarship to St. Augustine's, and had a special offering to contribute to the purchase of a permanent camp-site for negroes.

Soon after our meeting last spring, I attended the Forward in Service Planning Conference held at the Church of the Advent, Birmingham, Alabama. The Conference for Diocesan Leaders here in Wilson is patterned after this meeting, men and women leaders of all diocesan departments planning together.

Since we were unable to hold our conference at Vade Mecum last summer on account of the "Polio" epidemic, we used our fall District Meetings as combined District Meetings and Educational Institutes. A team of five people, made up of the Rev. George Henry, chairman of the Diocesan Department of Promotion; Miss Venetia Cox, missionary from China; Mrs. W. S. Holmes, chair-

man of Christian Education for the Auxiliary; Mrs. U. T. Holmes, a former president and your president, toured the diocese attending each of the six meetings held.

At two of the Rural Institutes, conducted by the Rev. C. E. B. Robinson, I taught classes for women on the Fellowship of the Prayer Book. In October I attended the meeting of the Provincial Synod of the Fourth Province held at Christ Church, Nashville, Tenn. I conducted one Woman's Auxiliary Institute and visited a good many Auxiliaries.

For two years I have been your president, and now I feel prepared to make certain observations; Auxiliary women are active on the home front and doing their part in the Red Cross, War Bond drives, Clothing drives, and all such agencies, and coming more and more to realize that all Christian social relations are definitely a part of their duty as Church women. I believe we are beginning to understand something of what is meant by sacrificial living. As far as numbers are concerned, we are not growing very fast, if at all. In 1943, we had reported 3343 members. That year we lost 34 by death, leaving 3309. In 1944, we had 3339 reported, which means that we gained 30 members. But in 1944 we lost 30 by death. This year our Roll of Remembrance contains 43 names. We have only one new branch reported and I doubt very much if it has that many members. With more than a hundred branches, it seems that if we were more convincing witnesses, our growth would be more rapid. As you know, we increased our budget this year by \$600.00 and our Treasurer tells me that it looks as if we're going to meet it all right.

For some time we've felt that our report blanks needed revision, and that has been done. We hope you'll make every effort to answer them intelligently, and send them to the person for whom they are intended. A great many of you stated on this year's reports that your greatest need was leadership. The meeting in Wilson is our first attempt to do something about this need. Here we hope to inform your leaders of the Plan of Action for next year and send them back to you full of enthusiasm for its execution. Our program at Vade Mecum offers the most adequate answer to the problem of training for leadership.

As we begin to consider next year's Forward in Service emphasis—The Christian Fellowship; The Missionary Imperative—let us think again and again of some of the imperatives of Jesus:

“I must be about my Father's business.”

“Other sheep I have that are not of this fold. Them also I must bring.”

“I must work the works of Him that sent me, while it is day.”

**MINUTES OF THE CONFERENCE FOR DIOCESAN LEADERS
ST. TIMOTHY'S CHURCH, WILSON, N. C., APRIL 10-11, 1945**

The Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary of the diocese of North Carolina, the Executive Council, heads of departments and representatives of diocesan objectives met in St. Timothy's Church, Wilson, on April 10 and 11.

The session opened at noon on the 10th with the Bishop having prayers and a meditation on the subject "What It Means To Be a Worker With Him." To illustrate his address on this subject, the Bishop selected the story of Moses and the burning bush. He said that the fact that the bush though burning was not consumed illustrated the fact that no one working for God is ever exhausted . . . Leaders are not those with extraordinary qualifications and talents but just ordinary folks; an ordinary person with an extraordinary sense of God in his life is the person to be chosen as a leader. It was from lowly walks of life that the Apostles were called.

The first qualification is the reverent spirit.

The second, an intelligent grasp of responsibility—or situations.

Third, self distrust—a real humility.

What we need is an educational program on social affairs . . . God talks to us in the terms of our own experience.

The meeting adjourned for luncheon which was served in the beautiful parish house by the ladies of St. Timothy's branch.

The Executive Board met in the church from 2 to 4. At this meeting the report of the nominating committee for diocesan officers was received.

At 4 o'clock Diocesan Objectives were presented to the board.

Mrs. Whisnant in her report of the Thompson Orphanage told us of Christmas among her eighty-five children; about the wedding of an eighteen year old girl there, and also about Easter.

Miss Adelaide Winslow in her usual pleasing manner told us about life at St. Mary's.

Miss Margaret Fletcher of St. Mary's House, Greensboro, made us feel that the work among the students there was one of the very worthwhile objectives of the diocese.

Vade Mecum was ably presented by the Rev. Robt. Turner, Jr. The Rev. Mr. Smyth who is business manager expressed his hope to make it the best camp in the south.

A letter from the Rev. I. H. Hughes expressed his sorrow at not being able to be present.

At 8 P. M. there was an evening service in the church; at which time Dr. Lewis B. Franklin, Treasurer of the National Council, was the speaker. His subject was "Missions as an Aid to the Christian Fellowship." It was a most inspiring message and the large congregation went to their homes with food for thought and action. He spoke of having visited islands of the south Pacific where he noted the great difference in the faces of those who had accepted the Christian way of life. A layman whose face shines with "the knowledge and love of God" made all who had the privilege of hearing him resolve to make their individual work for the Master of more account.

After the evening service an informal reception was held in the parish house in order that all might greet Dr. Franklin. It was

Mrs. Peoples' wish that such a reception might be held in order that the members of the Executive Board and also members of the Executive Council might get better acquainted; she was not disappointed.

On Wednesday morning at 7:30, Holy Communion was celebrated by Bishop Penick and breakfast followed in the parish house. The United Thank Offering was presented at the service and amounted to \$3502.57. The Roll of Remembrance was also read showing that forty-seven members of the Auxiliary had entered into life eternal during the past year.

At 9 o'clock the business session opened.

The President called attention to the Kanuga booklets.

She expressed her appreciation of the work done by the committee on suggestions for improving the Year Book and said that she especially approved the adoption of specific objectives for the year and a standard of achievement. Mrs. Huddle, as chairman of this committee, had presented its findings at the meeting of the Executive Board.

Mrs. Clarkson moved that the meeting express its appreciation of the work done in this matter; seconded by Mrs. Holmes; carried.

There was considerable discussion regarding Russian Kits and Mrs. Hart of Charlotte generously said that she would see it through.

Letters from the North Carolina Council of Churches were read and Bishop Penick spoke of his interest therein, quoting Dr. Cunningham as having said that it presented the power of Protestant opinion. He said we were apt to feel that we did not amount to much in large and public affairs; that Protestant Public opinion was responsible for Dumbarton Oaks.

Mrs. Clarkson moved that a resolution be adopted—

RESOLVED; that as an Executive Board to the Diocese of North Carolina we endorse the Dumbarton Oaks conference as the basis for a permanent peace.

She also moved that copies be sent to our Senators, Representatives from North Carolina and the State Department in Washington; seconded by Mrs. Hairston; carried.

In regard to this same subject, Miss Hall said that we must not forget that "prayer is our secret weapon" and that in this way our influence would be great.

The president expressed her wish that on the opening day of the conference in San Francisco, April 25th, every church remain open all day for intercessory prayer.

The Rev. Ray Holder, Chairman of Forward in Service, was to have been the leader in a joint conference at 9:30 but a telegram from him on Tuesday night said he would be unable to attend because of the illness of Mrs. Holder.

The president said that this meeting was patterned after the one held in Birmingham, Alabama, last May—planning Forward in Service programs. The heads of all national departments were in attendance at that conference. That our department heads had been asked to this session in order that we might plan to co-operate in what they wish done. The Plan of Action is the program of the Church and the more we can plan it together, the more we shall accomplish.

Reports of the District Chairmen were received.

The United Thank Offering Custodian, Mrs. Hairston, reported as follows:

Mrs. Hairston stated that this was not complete.

Speaking of the Legislative Council, the president said it had been a great privilege to serve on this council. They feel that their work has been in the right direction and well worth while. Dr. Ellen Winston said it was a "socially-minded Legislature." The report of the needs of the people in the diocese will come to us so we must be ready for it and see what our job will be from now on.

Mrs. Bouigny reported that the auditors of the financial reports for last year made no charge for their work.

The president asked for the report of the nominating committee for Provincial representative on the National Executive Board. Mrs. Holmes submitted only one name—that of Mrs. Francis Clarkson of Charlotte; nomination seconded by Mrs. Hart; carried.

The Bishop said it would help if it was made known that the Executive Board this year is the voice of the Diocese.

The next business was the Conference for Diocesan leaders.

A Preview of the Plan of Action was given by the Bishop.

Subject: The Missionary Imperative.

It is a call to all of us to become God's missionaries near at hand and throughout the world.

Objectives for 1944-45

Approved last fall at the clergy conference; issued from the conference at Birmingham, Alabama.

1. Financial.

- Full acceptance of the quota of the National council for 45-46.
- Creation of a reasonable reserve; we should be prepared for economic strain after the war is over.
- Adoption of a salary standard; especially in regard to the negro clergy.

2. Buildings.

In 45-46 we hope to see a building at St. Paul's, Thomasville and St. James', Kannapolis, and a parish house at St. Stephen's, Winston-Salem (for negroes).

3. The Chapel at Vade Mecum. It must be understood that it is not exclusively a project of the men of the diocese.

4. Confirmation candidates.

The Bishop said he had asked for 700 confirmation candidates for 1945; 800 for 1946.

5. Young Peoples' organizations.

- For Negro and white congregations.
- Diocesan conference grounds for negroes.

6. Diocesan college study conferences.
7. Plans for returning service men under the department of Christian Social Relations.
8. St. Michael's, Charlotte, to become a parish.

It was announced that Mr. Cleveland Thayer, key man for the Laymen's group was unable to be present due to a conflicting meeting. His message to us was that "It is almost high-noon of opportunity" and that he feels we have lost two years in the preparation for our program for post-war plans. The laymen should work with the women for a great assembly like the Woman's Auxiliary convention and the men meeting together so that the corporate mind may find expression.

The Rev. Gray Temple spoke on Youth in the Plan of Action. He called attention to the change being made from the Y.P.S.L. to the Youth Department, which is organized and about ready to go into action. The program for Youth at Vade Mecum this year will be a "Work" program instead of a "Fun" program. Mr. Temple asked earnestly for the cooperation of the women of the Auxiliary. The Bishop said that one representative from the Auxiliary should be on the Youth Department staff; Mrs. Bourne was appointed to serve for the balance of the year in this capacity.

Worship

In discussing Women in the Plan, Mrs. Peoples recommended Extending the Fellowship of the Prayer Book as a text book.

Reemphasize the Fellowship of Prayer.

At Vade Mecum she is planning prayer groups in the cottages and hopes to place in each cottage a person who has had experience in the practice of prayer.

She also suggested an Office of Prayer for Missions, obtainable at "281" and said the Calendar of Prayer is also a great help. We should pray for people all over the world by name and thus create enthusiasm for the Imperative. She asked us to really study these things and try to know why we are church women.

Study

The Doctrine of the Incarnation is the subject of the course of study to be conducted by the Bishop at the Woman's Auxiliary conference at Vade Mecum.

Also recommended for study—The Cross over Africa, by Newell S. Booth and

These Moving Times, by Herman Moss.

Dr. Eugene Pfaff, Executive Secretary of the Institute of International Relations, of Chapel Hill has been invited to come to Vade Mecum to discuss peace proposals.

The president reminded us that Bishop and Mrs. Kroll are now in Asheville and said she expected to ask them to come to Vade Mecum also and tell us of their experiences in Africa.

Service

1. Giving ourselves to the winning of others.
2. Giving ourselves in our work.
3. In the world work of the church, we have a part.

Here time for discussion by heads of departments was given.

Mrs. Peoples said we must make up for the loss of reports of the delegates and asked that each district chairman in April or

May invite the presidents and Educational chairmen of every branch to meet with her and try to put over to them what has been done at this meeting and stressing what the Bishop said regarding leadership and also about Dr. Franklin's address. Try to stress the important things and not the trivial. We are learning now the value of first things! We must be Workers Together with Him; to study to show ourselves approved of God—workmen that need not be ashamed. She then read the Epistle for the week and said it summed up next year's program—The Christian Imperative.

It was announced that the offering for the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief, taken at the evening service, amounted to \$50.31.

After closing prayers by the Bishop, the meeting adjourned.

Luncheon was again served in the parish house at which time Mrs. F. O. Clarkson gave the report of the Courtesy committee.

REPORT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION SECRETARY

At its Annual Meeting in Winston-Salem, April 1944, the Executive Board voted to request the Educational Secretary to prepare monthly programs for the Auxiliary column in *The North Carolina Churchman*; since so much of the material is not available at the time of the printing of the Year Book. I have therefore, sent suggestions for study to the paper each month, together with reading lists and references to available material. This seems to have been acceptable and I should like to continue doing it.

At a meeting in Birmingham, we were pledged to conform our programs to the Plan of Action of The Forward-in-Service Commission. With these two guides and continuing with the theme of Worldwide Christian Fellowship, we had an abundance of material. At times, there has been almost too much to use profitably; but it is interesting how it all tied in together as we followed the Plan of Action and the Outline for Mission Study adopted by the Missionary Education Movement, adapted and edited by our leaders at "281."

International and Interracial Understanding were made easier for us through Intercessory Prayer, so that when we came to study the *American Indian* and *West of the Date Line*, we went not as strangers, but as fellow members of the Household of Faith.

It was not difficult to find in the Acts of the Apostles the same teaching. Our vision must have been broadened and our sympathies enlarged through our study.

In order to make up, in some measure, for the lack of the Vade Mecum Conference, Mrs. Peoples arranged to have, on each program of the fall District Meetings the discussion of the Mission Study Books, led by Mrs. U. T. Holmes who was to have had this at Vade Mecum. She aroused much interest and I feel sure that the reports of interested study on the two subjects were due to the way in which she presented them. Almost every branch reported study of either the Indian or Southeast Asia and Southwest Pacific; some having had classes on both.

Also, at the district meetings, time was given for the subject of Intercessory Prayer Groups to be discussed and it was my privilege to lead this, since I had had the benefit of instruction under Dr. Barth at Kanuga Conference. There were a few prayer groups reported to me. I had the joy of helping with some.

During the year, I have attended several Auxiliary meetings over the diocese presenting these subjects, viz.: The Fellowship of the Prayer Book, Christian Stewardship Today, The Christian Doctrine of God, Church in the Life of Women and the two Mission Books. I had part in one Rural Institute in Thomasville, conducted by Mr. C. E. B. Robinson.

As an alternate delegate, I attended Provincial Synod in Christ Church, Nashville, Tenn.

The greatest joy that I derived from my year's work was in the preparation of the study on The Acts of the Apostles, which was distributed at the district meetings. I had report of only one Auxiliary's using it though I trust that others have, and that there will be others before we go into our Bible Study next year. I anticipate much satisfaction in preparing the Life of St. Paul, as we continue, with the thought of *God's Gift of Salvation* and our *Responsibility*, to *Publish Glad Tidings*.

REPORT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

I want to begin my report to you with one definition of Christian Social Relations. "Christian Social Relations is first, love and dedication of self to God, and then, love to our neighbor, which expresses itself in words and deeds of love and good will."

From the seventy-seven Auxiliaries who sent in reports of the work done in 1944 it is gratifying to learn that our women are continuing to express their love and good will to our neighbors. Neighbors who live nearby as well as those living far from us.

The activities listed ranged from assisting in the birth of a baby, doing the family laundry during a mother's illness to soliciting in Community and Red Cross Drives.

That the work covered a very wide field is evidenced by the number of agencies outside the parish, listed as channels through which our women have served. Of these agencies the Red Cross heads the list, followed by clubs for soldiers and work in hospitals. In many of our parishes today there is the opportunity for work in nearby camps and the reports show untiring service of all sorts for the men in the armed forces.

Increased interest in interracial relations can be recorded for programs and discussion groups on this subject were reported. Help, both financial as well as gifts of food, clothing, books, and magazines were given to colored families, schools and churches.

The Thompson Orphanage continues to be our important and most concrete project of the Christian Social Relations Department. The Auxiliaries gave money, gifts, clothing, furniture and soap wrappers last year, also contributions to the Building Fund.

The following Diocesan and National objectives were supported last year: Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief, Chinese Relief, Collection of Clothing for War-Torn Europe, Leper Fund and Fund for education of Bishop Chien's daughter.

In this department our reports cannot be as factual as in some others. However, the yearly report is not written primarily for the files but to be used as a yardstick. Where we have fallen short,

let us make a greater effort; where we have done good work, let us make it even better; where new work presents itself let us widen our field of service.

In the coming year it is particularly important that every parish church and especially the Auxiliary women should be prepared to welcome all those returning from war service and to assist them in re-establishing themselves in their homes, their church and in the community.

World Fellowship in Christ will exist when the true meaning of Christian Social Relations is demonstrated in our individual lives in our daily living. We are called Christians. Let us be worthy.

REPORT OF THE SUPPLY DEPARTMENT

In the past we have been given the names of two clergymen, who have either retired from active service or whose salary was small. Checks were sent to these for their personal use.

At the April meeting of the National Executive Board it was recommended that these checks be based on a standard amount depending on the composition of the family and be sent out by the National Supply Secretary from funds provided by the diocesan branches for the purpose. The amount allocated to your diocese is \$150; of this one-fourth will be used for gifts supplementing salaries of active missionary priests and retired priests and those on pensions, and to active lay workers not affected by the Triennial resolution. This latter group includes the Indian catechists in South Dakota and a few other scattered lay employees. Our \$150 was paid in the fall of this year.

At the meeting of the National Executive Board in October the following action was taken by the Board: Since it appears that the needs in the mission field are not likely to continue to absorb the entire production capacity represented by the supply work of the women of the church, we recommend to the diocesan executive boards that their supply secretaries in cooperation with other appropriate officers encourage women's groups in the parishes to in-

clude in their supply work the following fields, in addition to the missions provided for through the national assignment.

1. Diocesan missions, institutions and agencies.
2. Welfare agencies and institutions in local communities.
3. War relief through such agencies as the American Red Cross, American Friend's Service Committee, the Russian, Greek, and other national war relief committees.

This year the supply department has sent clothes to Red Cross, Russian and Greek Relief, also to the Thompson Orphanage. Boxes of many useful garments were sent to Miss Lillie Hill and Mrs. Sam Duncan, Cowan, Tennessee.

Miss Stabler suggested that we send the few garments which we had on our supply shelves to Rev. Frank Thorburn, Pine Ridge Agency, S. D. We divided these and sent the children's garments to the Thompson Orphanage.

One hundred and fifty dollars was sent to All Saints' Mission in Puerto Rico.

One of our allotments was to the Shoshone Indian Mission School, Wind River, Wyoming. Requests were for children's clothes, infants' clothes, household articles and miscellaneous articles. Last fall \$75 was sent for shoes. It has been impossible to obtain all the things asked for. We did manage to buy enough material to make seventy-three garments, made by different branches, more were willing to sew but we could not buy any more material. In the place of the garments we were unable to furnish, we sent a check for \$150, hoping that they would have more luck in buying things.

Our other allotment was to the John Moncure and Grace Church, Miller's Tavern, Va. Their requests were for household articles entirely, sheets, pillowcases, bedspreads, and blankets. All of these were sent with the exception of the blankets. We sent \$100 for these. \$15 was sent them last fall for hospital supplies.

The financial report will follow. I am turning over a check for \$842.96 to my successor.

These three years have been most pleasant. We have been successful in completing all the allotments with the exception of a few articles this last year. Thanks so much to each Supply Secretary and also each Auxiliary member for their hearty cooperation.

We are anxious to have members of the Woman's Auxiliary visit us at any time and see the work in action.

Our grateful appreciation goes out to the women of the Auxiliary who are making these things possible.

In past years, we have had a noble list of missionaries; today we have one priest and two wives active, beyond the limits of the United States. I pay tribute to the splendid work being done by the six women in the domestic field, and I should like to tell you of the expressions of appreciation of the work Inez Middleton is doing among the negroes in Arkansas, that I heard when I traveled in that diocese last fall. I am not unmindful of the conditions in many of the "foreign" fields, but I am also mindful of the unparalleled opportunities which may be ours a few years hence. So, it seems to me that *now*, we should be emphasizing in the Church Schools, in all our Youth work, at the Summer Camps and Conferences, the need of the healing Gospel of Jesus Christ. Not only efforts for humanitarian betterment, but the Kingship of our Lord Himself."

REPORT OF LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

To Members of the State Legislative Council

From: Eunice P. McCrary, President, 127 Brooks Avenue, Raleigh, N. C.,

We are enclosing a report of the achievements of the State Legislative Council in the 1945 General Assembly. You will note that while we did not get all we were asking for in the way of social legislation we did make some definite gains. Your cooperation helped to make this success possible and we are very grateful to you for your effective work.

We are sending you also a list of the items suggested by the Council at its meeting on April 6 for consideration in making up the 1947 Legislative Program. Your organization is invited to suggest other items it would like to submit to the Council for inclusion in this list. Please let us know as soon as possible the action taken by your organization.

The Council wishes to call to your particular attention the constitutional amendment (to be submitted to North Carolina voters in the next election) which will remove from the State Constitution basic discriminations against women. That discriminations exist was emphasized in the recent Supreme Court decision regarding jury service by women.

This interim between meetings of the Legislature is a very important period for us. We are counting on you to reach out to all of the branches of your organization with information on the vital issues on our program. If we can enlist the active interest and support of the fifty thousand members of our organizations in the cause of progressive social legislation then nothing will be impossible for us.

It has been a pleasure to work with you during the past year and we are wishing you continued success in all that you undertake.

REPORT OF THE ACTIVITIES OF THE STATE LEGISLATIVE
COUNCIL DURING THE 1945 SESSION OF THE
GENERAL ASSEMBLY

"Let us move forward in faith and not sit back in fear."

The State Legislative Council sponsored four measures in the 1945 legislative program. Progress was made in all four measures. A brief survey follows:

1. Raise the compulsory school attendance age from 14 to 16 years and provide for its enforcement through the State Department of Public Instruction.

Report—H. B. No. 113

The age for compulsory school attendance was raised to 15 years for the school year 1945-46 and to 16 years thereafter. Children living on farms or engaged in commercial fishing or fisheries are exempt for the duration of the war and six months thereafter. There was also an amendment which provided that for the dura-

tion of the war and six months thereafter the superintendent or principal may excuse any boy to engage in gainful occupations or employment permitted by the labor laws of the State.

The only law passed with reference to enforcement provisions is an amendment to the School Machinery Act which provides that "The State Board of Education may employ one or more attendance officers for each Educational District, determine their duties and fix their compensation to be paid from the nine months school fund." This of course leaves the matter of providing attendance officers in the eight educational districts in the discretion of the State Board of Education. No appropriation was made for this purpose and the only funds that could be used would be money allocated for the operation of the nine months school term.

II. Provide for improved public library service through further increase in State Aid for Public Libraries.

Report—Appropriation Measure

The request for State Aid for Public Libraries was for an appropriation of \$100,000 increase for each year in the next biennium. The Library Commission was granted an increase of \$50,000 for each year—making a total amount of \$175,000 for each year of the biennium 1945-47. This amount divided among one hundred counties will mean \$1660 per year. Each of the participating counties is receiving \$1440 for the year 1944-45. The request for \$225.00 which was originally made would have meant an additional \$500 for each county.

The Representatives, who came to Raleigh, were far better informed about libraries than ever before and their attitude was very encouraging. The librarians and people interested in library service seemed grateful for the work done in the various counties by members of the Legislative Council.

III. Provide expanded facilities for the care and treatment of the feeble-minded children of both races.

Report—House Resolution No. 297

A joint resolution was passed giving primary claim for a building program at Caswell as soon as construction can be resumed.

This resolution was a result of overwhelming public opinion, repeatedly expressed toward providing adequate facilities for the feeble-minded of our state. Although appropriations were not made at this time, it is reasonably certain that construction can be started as soon as wartime conditions permit and building restrictions are lifted.

H. B. No. 148

This bill provides for the establishment of an institution for the care of feeble-minded negro children in North Carolina.

No appropriation was made for this item, but like the Caswell building program, it is dependent upon a special session of the General Assembly.

We should stay on the alert and see that when building restrictions are lifted adequate facilities are provided.

The magnitude of the operation for one year of the four mental institutions is indicated below:

Appropriations for operation and maintenance of the four institutions for 1945-46 were \$3,943,810.00.

Increased appropriations over 1943-44 were \$1,646,973.00.

To be spent for additions and betterments (restoring wards, major repairs, employees' cottages) \$992,718.00.

Members of the Council will be gratified to know that another group of handicapped children were provided for in—

S. B. No. 178

This bill provides for the establishment of a hospital for the treatment of children affected with spastic ailments.

IV. Make adequate provisions for modernizing the jail system and for bringing it up to minimum approved standards.

H. B. No. 451

This bill provides for authority for bringing sub-standard jails up to minimum health and welfare requirements. While no specific legislation was passed, definite gains were made, which partially compensates for the loss of the bill after it had passed three of its four hurdles. It will take education of the legislators as well as the influence of member organizations to get legislation that will improve our jail system. The objection to this bill came primarily from county commissioners and the Sheriff organizations.

It was gratifying to note that the Press was uniformly for the content of the bill.

While our main activities have been centered on these measures, we have not been unconcerned about other Social Legislation. Among which were—Increased pay for qualified teachers, Cancer Control program, Narcotic Education, Statewide referendum on the Liquor Question, Stabilization of a Minimum State Wage Law, Divorce Laws, Medical Care, Women's right to serve on Juries, Nurses' Bill.

To obtain social legislation, as well as other desirable legislation, the most important thing is to elect legislators and governors who are sincerely interested in this kind of legislation.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT OF EDGECOMBE

The annual District Meeting was held in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Rocky Mount, on October 21, with good attendance and a most inspiring program. The reports of the secretaries showed interest in our Auxiliary programs, especially the Educational program. More study classes were held during the past year than ever before.

In January, an Executive Board meeting was held with all the District officers present. It was decided at this meeting that the District of Edgcombe should offer at least two scholarships for young people to Vade Mecum for the Youth Conference week, the funds to be raised by asking each member of every branch of the Auxiliary to give ten cents; the quota was raised very promptly.

During Lent, each branch in the District was given an opportunity to contribute to a fund for the Rev. W. J. Gordon's work in Alaska, as a special missionary objective for the District during Lent. The funds were sent to Mrs. S. M. Gary, Missionary correspondent. She reported \$70 sent Mr. Gordon and \$5 sent to the Gordon baby as a gift from the District.

A Christian Education Conference was held at the home of the Chairman, Mrs. Philips, with a good representation from the

branches present, and plans discussed for carrying out the study programs more systematically. Also, the chairman of Young People's Work, Mrs. Long, and the chairman of Christian Social Relations, Mrs. Lewis, held a joint conference at the home of Mrs. Long in May, and each branch secretary of the two departments was invited to attend. More than twenty were present and a most worthwhile discussion was led by Mrs. Long for young people and by Mrs. Lewis for Christian Social Relations.

We feel that our District has made a real contribution in service since our last report, and with more interest being shown in Christian Education and the work with our young people we hope to accomplish greater things.

The fall meeting will be held in Jackson.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT OF GRANVILLE

The speakers at the Educational Institute for the Fall Meeting of the District of Granville, held in Holy Innocents, Henderson, October 23, 1944, were no mean substitute for the Auxiliary Conference at Vade Mecum and as a result the work of the Auxiliary has shown no lack of inspiration.

Mrs. U. T. Holmes' talk on the Mission Study in the Woman's Auxiliary, Southeast Asia and the Southwest Pacific, brought home to us the importance of the study of this particular part of the world just at this time. Miss Venetia Cox told of her personal experiences in China after the war began and of how determined the young people were in trying to carry on their schools. Appropriations are inadequate for even absolute necessities. The Rev. George Henry, Chairman of Promotion, gave us an inspiring message on the Church's Program. He said "The Church is the body of Christ

in the world." He emphasized that through our participation in the Every Member Canvass we can give our support to the Church throughout the world, that our task is to redeem the world, and that it is only through the Church that peace can be realized.

At the request of the Chairman of the Youth Commission, I appointed as Secretary of Young People's Work for the District, Mrs. Joel Cheatham of Henderson. She explained the purpose of this branch of work.

Ten dollars, accumulated over a period of time, was sent to the Grace Chen Educational fund.

Mrs. Peoples made an appeal for help for the Negro Camp Site and \$5.00 from the offering for the day was given to this project.

Mrs. Walter Burwell, Missionary Correspondent, asked for \$5.00 to be used for a Christmas gift for Miss Bettie Gordon. This request was granted.

Tribute was paid those who had entered the larger life, especially Mrs. H. G. Cooper who has meant so much to the work of the Church.

Sixty-four members answered to Roll Call.

Holy Trinity, Townsville, extended an invitation for the meeting in the Fall of 1945.

As Chairman, I wish to express my approval of having annual reports of the Departments sent to the Chairman. I think this plan will keep us in closer touch with the work of the Auxiliary as a whole.

ITEMS SUGGESTED FOR CONSIDERATION IN PREPARING THE COUNCIL'S 1947 LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM

1. Adequate provision for the enforcement of the compulsory school attendance law through the State Department of Public Instruction.
2. Provision for modernizing the jail system and for bringing it up to approved minimum standards.
These two items are unfinished business on which we will want to continue to work until we secure constructive action.
3. More adequate provision for medical care and hospitalization.
4. Minimum wage and hour law.
5. Provision for financing cancer control clinics set up under the State Board of Health.
These are new items which need to be presented to your organization for study and action at your next state convention or executive board meeting.
6. Continued support of the program to provide adequate care and treatment of white and Negro feebleminded children.
This item was included for continued support since no definite appropriations for buildings were included in the bills passed by the recent legislature. The reason for the failure to include specific appropriations was the uncertainty of building conditions at this time, and that may be taken care of by a special session of the Legislature.

THE PARISH COUNCIL

A Parish is a religious congregation comprising all those who worship together in one church. Each Parish is a very important part of the organization of the whole Church. The Rector is the head of the Parish and of the Parish Council.

A Council is an assembly of persons met in consultation or to give advice.

A Parish Council, therefore, is an assembly of persons within a Parish, who meet to consult and discuss with each other the needs of the Parish. Many Parishes, through Councils, are realizing and meeting the need of definite programs of service. Usually the leaders of various groups in the Parish Vestry, Sunday School, Y. P. S. L., Auxiliary Branches, Boy Scouts, Choir, Altar Guild, etc., compose the Council. In order to interest the Parish in Community Social Service and also to recognize members of a Parish who are doing that kind of work, representation can be given for outside activities. This will be of value in carrying out the Forward in Service Program, which emphasizes Christian Community Service.

Some Duties of a Parish Council:

1. To make a survey of the Parish, its conditions, responsibilities and needs. This survey will bring forth new possibilities for work and new material.
2. To understand what each organization is trying to do and to feel a responsibility for each organization.
3. To plan ways and means of enlisting every member in some part of the Church's work. To definitely plan to interest and enlist new people in the work of the Parish.
4. To make a survey of workers, so that when a vacancy has to be filled, instead of the Rector having to try to find someone, he will through the Parish Council's survey, really know the right person for the particular place.
5. To see that Leadership Training is a part of the life of a successful Parish.
6. To demonstrate not only to others but to ourselves that there is a unity of purpose, not a spirit of rivalry, throughout the work of the Church. The Church's mission must be the pervading ambition of the members of the Council. They should be conversant with the whole Program of the Church.
7. The Council should formulate a Parish program which will present definite suggestions for the united task of the men, women and children of the Parish.

The Parish Council is valuable in bringing into closer understanding all of the organizations. Parishes, where the Council plan has been adopted, unite their entire membership in a program of service to individuals, the community, the Diocese, the nation, the world. It is in these Parishes that there is the truest comprehension of the statement that "the Parish is not only a field in which to work but a force with which to work."

SUGGESTIONS FOR BRANCH PRESIDENTS

1. Have Installation of Officers and Chairmen annually by your Rector.
2. Read all letters and other communications from Diocesan and District officers and departmental chairmen. Select what is useful and educational and tell it to your group.
3. Get acquainted with your Church Missions House, 281 Fourth Avenue, New York 10, New York. They will do their best to answer any questions. Order from them the new booklet, "When You Organize," "Women in the Life of the Church" and "When You Are Chairman." You will find all three very helpful and each costs only a small sum—5 to 10 cents. "When You Are Chairman" is a booklet with simple parliamentary rules.
4. Annual Reports—yours to your District Chairman, send in February your Parish Chairmen to their District Chairmen.
5. Election of officers and chairmen should be held in April.
6. In sending in your report be sure to give the names and addresses of all officers and chairmen who will serve during the ensuing year. **THIS IS IMPORTANT SO THAT NAMES AND ADDRESSES CAN REACH THE DIOCESAN PRESIDENT AND SECRETARY WHO COMPILE AND ISSUE THE YEAR-BOOK.**
7. First and last—stress the **DEVOTIONAL** part of your program. More than ever do we need **PERSONAL EVANGELISM.**

SUGGESTIONS FOR DISTRICT CHAIRMEN

1. Help your Parish Branches to know the work of the Woman's Auxiliary, by personal visits and letters.
2. Insist on Parish Presidents reporting at once to their District Chairmen any change of officers or chairman, this information to be passed on immediately to the Diocesan officer or chairman.
3. Arrange for a District Meeting each Fall, with a program that will furnish information and create interest in work undertaken by the Diocesan Auxiliary and in matters of immediate importance to the whole Church.
4. Have your District Board to meet to help plan the District Meeting.
5. Remind the Parish Presidents that April is the time for election of officers and chairmen, and urge that Parish reports be sent in February.

6. SEND YOUR DISTRICT REPORT TO YOUR DIOCESAN PRESIDENT BY MARCH 15TH.
7. See that your District Chairman of Promotion sends in news of the District to the Diocesan Chairman.
8. SEND THE NAMES AND ADDRESSES OF ALL DISTRICT OFFICERS AND CHAIRMEN TO YOUR DIOCESAN SECRETARY BY MAY 15TH.

DISTRICT CHAIRMEN, IT IS YOUR RESPONSIBILITY TO KEEP IN TOUCH WITH YOUR PARISH CHAIRMEN REGULARLY, PASSING ON IMMEDIATELY INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR DEPARTMENT RECEIVED FROM YOUR DIOCESAN CHAIRMEN.

THE DISTRICT SETUP IS THE TRAINING GROUND FOR FUTURE DIOCESAN LEADERS.

THE DIOCESAN CHAIRMAN SENDS INFORMATION AND HELP TO HER DISTRICT CHAIRMAN. THE DISTRICT CHAIRMAN SENDS IT ON TO HER PARISH CHAIRMAN.

NOTE TO PARISH CHAIRMEN: If you do not hear from your District Chairman at least once in three months, write her and tell her you are waiting to hear. This also applies to the relationship between the District and Diocesan Chairmen.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be, "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

ARTICLE II

Object

The object of this organization shall be to help in carrying out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church. Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education and Christian Social Service.

ARTICLE III

Membership

The membership of this organization shall be composed of all Parish and Mission Branches within the Diocese.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: A President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of Christian Education, a Secretary of Christian Social Relations, a Secretary of Supply, a Custodian of United Thank Offering.

Section 2. These officers with the District Chairman shall constitute the Executive Board and shall meet at least twice a year at the call of the President.

ARTICLE V

Duties of Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for. She shall also preside at meetings, and at every Annual Meeting shall address the Auxiliary. She shall make a report to the Diocesan Convention.

Section 2. The Vice-President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have specific duties to be decided in conference with the President.

Section 3. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist the President in preparing and having printed the Annual Report, and at each Annual Meeting shall make a report.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering and Box Work money, and shall make a report of same to the Annual Meeting. At the end of every fiscal year the Treasurer's accounts shall be verified by a public auditor. The Treasurer's report, as audited, shall be published in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Section 5. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Education shall promote and stimulate educational work in the branches of the Diocese by every means in her power, and carry out the program of the National Department of Religious Education.

Section 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Relations shall co-operate with the Christian Social Relations Departments of the Diocese and the National Council, in the promotion of their plans and programs.

Section 7. The Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in the Spring and Fall of each year, and shall remit immediately for investment to the Treasurer of the National Council.

Section 8. The Secretary of Supply shall have charge of the work of the Supply Department.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. All Diocesan officers shall be elected for a term of three years. The Treasurer and the United Thank Offering Custodian to be elected at the first annual meeting after the Triennial; the President, Secretary of Supply, and Secretary of Christian Social Relations to be elected at the second annual meeting after the Triennial; the President to take office at the third annual meeting after the Triennial; Vice-President and Secretary of Christian Education to be elected at the third annual meeting after the Triennial.

Section 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President.

ARTICLE VII

Districts

Section 1. For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into districts.

Section 2. A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman duly elected by her District for a term of three years. In case of vacancy the Vice-Chairman shall serve as Chairman.

Section 3. Each District shall hold at least one and, if possible, two meetings a year.

ARTICLE VIII

Election of Diocesan Officers

Section 1. Prior to the Annual Meeting, the President shall appoint from the Executive Board a nominating committee of three who shall consider proposed nominees to fill the elective offices at the Meeting, and from the names suggested or considered the Committee shall recommend to the Meeting the nominees for such offices.

The consent of the nominees shall be obtained by the Committee before making the recommendation. Nominations may be made from the floor of the Meeting by any delegate provided the consent of the nominee has been first obtained. A majority vote shall be required for all elections. In case there are more than two nominees for the same office and no candidate receives a majority vote, the name receiving the smallest number of votes shall be dropped from the ballot.

Section 2. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund for Calendar Year preceding the meeting.

ARTICLE IX

Finance

The Executive Committee in consultation with the Bishop shall prepare a budget for the year. The budget shall be presented to the branches for their support at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Section 2. From the total amount pledged towards the budget, one-half shall apply to the work of the National Council, one-half to the work of the Diocese.

Section 3. The United Thank Offering and contributions for the Supply Department shall be in addition to the payments on the budget.

ARTICLE X

Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present, provided a written copy of the proposed amendments has been filed with the Diocesan Secretary, and a notice of same mailed to each branch by the Secretary at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting.

BY-LAWS

The place and time of the Annual Meeting shall be approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

1. The order of Business for the Annual Meeting shall be arranged by the President and the Executive Committee.

2. Each Parish Branch having fifty members or less shall be represented by the Branch President and one other delegate (appointed by the President or elected by the Branch). The President, or her representative, and the delegates each has a vote. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the Branch to an additional delegate with power to vote.

3. Each Branch shall be assessed twenty-five cents per member to provide for Provincial Expenses, printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of Speakers, and other items necessary for the proper administration of this organization. This shall be known as the Central Fund.

4. One-fourth of the Branches having the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at the Annual Meeting. Five members shall constitute a quorum at the Executive Committee Meetings.

5. The Diocesan President shall appoint at the beginning of her second year of office the following Chairmen, to serve for three years: Chairman of Church Periodical Club; Interracial Chairman; Legislative Chairman; Missionary Correspondent; Chairman of Young Peoples' Work.

6. The District Officers shall correspond to the Diocesan Officers and shall be elected at the first meeting of the District after the Diocesan Annual Meeting.

The District Chairman shall appoint the following Chairmen, to serve for three years: (1) Church Periodical Club; (2) Prayer Partnership Correspondent; (3) Young Peoples' Work.

7. Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be the authority in all question of parliamentary law not covered by these By-Laws.

8. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates of any Annual Meeting.

It is right and fitting that those who have been duly elected as Diocesan Officers of the Woman's Auxiliary should be formally received and admitted into their respective offices in your presence, and that we should ask the blessing of God upon them for their support and guidance in the performance of the duties which you have laid upon them.

Who put their trust in thee.
Send them help from thy holy place.
And evermore mightily defend them,
O Lord, hear our prayer.

HISTORY OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY
in
THE DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA
1882-1946

"The Board of Missions at the General Convention in Baltimore in 1871, created the Woman's Auxiliary. Its first secretary, Miss Mary A. Emery, took office on the second day of January, 1872. Her appointment was announced in a letter sent to the rectors throughout the Church, asking their cooperation in the new enterprise, by the appointment of a parish secretary in each parish. To the fifteen hundred letters sent out, some three hundred and fifty answers were received, and with the appointment of these parish secretaries the work began."

This paragraph, quoted from "A Manual" of the Woman's Auxiliary, gives the beginning of the national organization known as the "Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions." Next year, in 1873 at least two branches were organized in North Carolina, one in Asheville and one in Edenton, the whole state at that time being only one diocese. In 1881 Mrs. John Wilkes of Charlotte conferred with the Rt. Rev. Theodore B. Lyman concerning a diocesan organization, and the following year at the Convention held in Tarboro, he appointed her Diocesan Secretary and she organized the six existing parish branches, Asheville, Edenton, Fayetteville, Charlotte, Hillsboro and Lenoir, into a diocesan branch.

The first "anniversary" meeting was held in Charlotte on Thursday afternoon, May 24, 1883, in connection with the Diocesan Convention. Eight of the then eleven parish branches were represented by delegates and there were visitors from five or more other parishes, and from the Presbyterian and Methodist Missionary Societies in Charlotte. Miss Julia Emery who had succeeded her sister as Executive Secretary, was the speaker. One item of business was the adoption of a Central Fund of ten cents. A summary of the financial report shows gifts of \$88.94 to Foreign and General Missions, \$70 to Domestic Missions, \$492.05 and one box, not valued, to Diocesan and Parochial Missions, and an expenditure of \$15.45 for postage, stationery and printing. During that year, the diocese of East Carolina was organized and the branches in that portion of the state withdrew from the North Carolina Diocesan Branch, with the exception of Fayetteville which remained until 1888. Later, in 1895 when the Missionary District of Asheville was organized, there was a further loss of some of the original branches.

A few gleanings from the early Annual Reports are of significant interest. Miss Emery was a frequent visitor at the diocesan meetings and soon after the branch was organized, made this appeal, "If every female communicant in the Diocese (state) of North Carolina would conscientiously give one cent a week, there would be \$1,000 extra for the Board of Missions." The first "Special" was undertaken in 1885-1886, an effort to raise \$25 for the "Tokio Hospital, Japan." The first Constitution was adopted in 1887 and it stated that five persons could form a quorum. A quotation from one of Miss Emery's early addresses is a challenge still, "Cannot

every interested woman this year, take as a special duty, the work of interesting someone uninterested?"

For thirteen years Mrs. Wilkes served as diocesan secretary, the only diocesan officer, though each convocation had an assistant secretary, approved by the Dean, to help in the work. Too much cannot be said of Mrs. Wilkes' faithful, wise and consecrated service, not only in the early years of the Auxiliary's history, but in her further capacity as Honorary Secretary, then Honorary President until her death in 1912, having then served through a period of thirty years.

Upon Mrs. Wilkes' resignation as Diocesan Secretary in 1895, Bishop Joseph Blount Cheshire appointed Miss Mary Horner of Oxford, as her successor. Miss Horner had formerly been head of the Junior Auxiliary which became a part of the diocesan organization in 1890, when the children's missionary societies which had been known as "Ministering Children's Leagues" or "Faithful Endeavor Societies" were formally unified. In 1895 the Babies Branch was organized with Mrs. Walter J. Smith in charge.

Miss Horner appointed an advisory committee to assist her in the duties of office. Her report of 1897 refers to the observance of four intercessory days, on the Feast of the Epiphany, the Annunciation, the Transfiguration and on St. Andrew's Day. Her addresses are filled with an emphasis on the power of prayer and the challenge of the spiritual life.

Miss Horner resigned in 1904. The women of the Auxiliary felt that the diocesan branch should have a President, and requested Bishop Cheshire to appoint his sister, Miss Kate Cheshire, to this office. He did so, but Miss Cheshire requested that she might serve as Executive Secretary under a President, and Mrs. W. H. S. Burgwyn was appointed first president. The organization was further developed by the appointment of Mrs. Dorian Blair of Greensboro as Treasurer. Mrs. Burgwyn served only one year when Mrs. Wilkes again became Diocesan head. At Mrs. Wilkes' death seven years later, Miss Cheshire was again asked to serve as president. She accepted and Miss Claudia Hunter became the diocesan secretary.

In 1907, the Auxiliary celebrated its Silver Jubilee, meeting again in Tarboro where it had first been organized. At this anniversary two memorable offerings were made. Annie Cheshire, daughter of the Bishop, offered for service in China where she is still working. Then, at a Corporate Communion Service, a silver offering of one thousand dollars was placed on the altar. This was used to help build St. Gabriel's Church, Selma. Another important event of this period was the meeting of the Synod of Sewanee in St. Peter's Church, Charlotte in 1912. This diocesan branch was again hostess to the Provincial Auxiliary when the Synod met at St. Paul's, Winston-Salem in 1938.

By 1918, the attendance at the Annual Meetings had increased to such an extent that it seemed advisable to have the meetings separate from the Diocesan Convention. At the meeting that year, at the Chapel of the Cross, Chapel Hill, Miss Cheshire resigned and Mrs. W. A. Hoke was appointed to the office of President. Mrs. Hoke served little more than a year when she was called to a higher

service. From the time of her death until the next Annual Meeting, the work was directed by Mrs. W. L. Wall, vice-president.

In the early days of the Auxiliary, all rectors were the active presidents of their branches and made the appointments. In the same manner, the Bishop served in the Diocese, until in 1921 when the delegates elected their own president, choosing Mrs. T. W. Bickett. Another change made at this meeting was the rule of rotation of office, and three years later, Mrs. Bickett was succeeded by Mrs. W. W. Way of St. Mary's School, Raleigh. While Mrs. Bickett was president, the eight Districts were organized and later, when the Convocational System was done away with, the Negro District was added. In 1927, Mrs. F. S. Spruill was elected president and three years later, Miss Rena Clark was chosen to that office.

During Miss Clark's term, in 1932, the Auxiliary celebrated its Golden Jubilee in Holy Innocents' Church, Henderson. Greetings were sent to this meeting by the six charter branches of fifty years before, and an offering of \$1,500 was given in appreciation of Bishop Cheshire, and was used to complete the building fund for the Cheshire Building at St. Augustine's College. The minutes of this meeting, in recording the reports of the past presidents, show some extent of the work at that time; in the growing interest in the United Thank Offering, the formation of branches in rural and textile areas of the diocese, the development of Inter-Racial work, the reorganization of the Box Work and the clothing of children at the Thompson Orphanage, and the Treasure and Trinket Fund which provided Communion Silver for needy missions.

Miss Emma J. Hall became president in 1933, and during that summer there was held the first Auxiliary Conference at the recently acquired Camp and Conference Center, Vade Mecum. Mrs. John L. Gilmer directed the two-weeks' Conference and the faculty was composed of Bishop Penick, Rev. and Mrs. Theodore H. Partrick, Rev. Jean Vaché and Mrs. Wm. J. Gordon with Rev. Roderick H. Jackson as chaplain. From a small beginning, this conference has become an important factor in the Auxiliary life.

Miss Hall was succeeded by Mrs. Wm. J. Gordon who, in turn, was followed by Mrs. W. S. Holmes as president. In 1942 Mrs. U. T. Holmes was elected president, but after serving one year, she moved with her family to Washington in the interest of war work. Mrs. E. G. Peoples became the next president, and to her fell the difficult task of leading the Auxiliary during the abnormal years of World War II. But the work, with its carefully laid foundations, had gone on from strength to strength, and in spite of the fact that no Annual Meeting could be held in 1945, in 1946, after the cessation of hostilities, the women met in St. Timothy's Church, Wilson, with a sense of ever increasing interest and power. At this meeting Mrs. Henry C. Bourne became president.

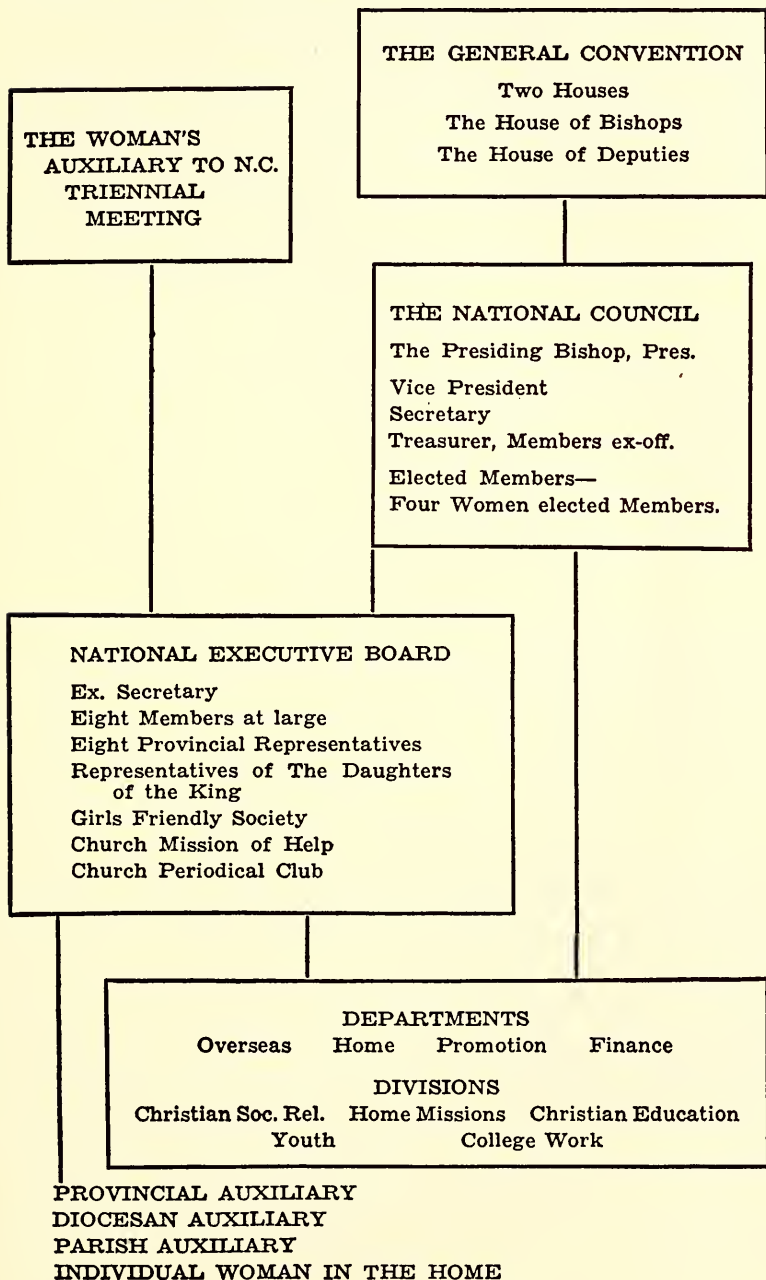
Article II of the original By-laws says, "The object of this Auxiliary is threefold—prayer for missions, study of missions and work for missions." It has been impossible to tell of the prayerful interest, and the generous gifts to the various mission fields of the world, or to record the names of those of this diocese who have served the cause of Christ at home or abroad. Nor has it been

possible to mention the faithful groups of officers and the great hosts of women who have given of themselves so generously during the past sixty-four years. If time and space allowed, it would be interesting to enumerate the "many and divers" activities in which this Auxiliary has been engaged, both in its own projects and in the program of the Church. But no history of a living thing ends; it but merges in the present, with the future. So in this year of our Lord 1946, He commands that we, with searching of heart, and a renewed emphasis on the eternal things of the Spirit, go forward, and we have His promise as we go, "Lo I am with you alway."

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

64th ANNUAL MEETING — WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

St. Timothy's Church, Wilson, April 30, 1946

In this, our first annual meeting since the cessation of hostilities, we are met to consider The Mission of the Church—A Power for Peace. In the hymn which we have just sung we have acknowledged that ours is the task to

“Publish glad tidings

Tidings of peace

Tidings of Jesus, redemption and release.”

First of all let us consider the Mission of the Church to be a Power for Peace in the individual life. All of our worship and fellowship here together, as well as Mrs. Gordon's interpretation of the Woman's Auxiliary prayer, with its broad implications, and the wise counsel of our Bishop, will help us to understand and appreciate this fact more.

Then, too, the Church must be a Power for Peace in her corporate life and acts. It is my purpose to report to you some of the ways that portion of the Church known as the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of North Carolina has tried to be a power for peace during the past year. Since, under our new plan for reports, summaries of the reports of all departments were sent to me I am better prepared to do this than ever before.

In the department of Christian Education we cooperated with the plan of the National church in putting on an extensive monthly program of education in preparation for the Reconstruction and Advance Fund. We bought all the books listed in Looking Towards Triennial, and established a lending library for the use of our women.

In the department of Christian Social Relations we have not only continued to support our own diocesan missionary, and the Thompson Orphanage, but participated in sending Christmas packages to churchmen in Europe, material aid to churches overseas, and numerous other drives for food and clothing. Through our membership in the Women's Action Committee for Victory and Lasting Peace we have lent our support to such national legislation as seemed to advance the cause of peace in the world.

In addition to completing our assignment of Supply Work sent to us from the National Church, we sent substantial gifts of second-hand clothing to St. Mary's School for Indian girls at Springfield, South Dakota.

The United Thank Offering has shown a consistent gain.

In the department of Finance we met our increased budget without any trouble at all, and ended 1945 with a nice balance of which you'll hear more from the treasurer.

The activities of the president for 1945 were much the same as for the other two years, and consisted in directing the Woman's Auxiliary Conference at Vade Mecum, attending and addressing all District Meetings, conducting several training institutes, attending the Provincial Executive Board meeting in Atlanta, attending meetings of the Diocesan Executive Council, the Department of Christian Education, our own Executive Board and visiting as many auxiliaries as possible.

Even from this glimpse of a tiny portion of the Church's corporate life and action, I think we can realize fully the truth of the following statement from the Presiding Bishop's Easter message:

"Surely on this Easter we must be conscious of the fact that God is summoning His Church to fulfil a responsibility immeasurably greater than any which He has assigned to us in the past. Not only is it world-wide in scope, but its fulfillment involves problems which have hitherto baffled us."

In planning this meeting we have had in mind some of these problems which the Church must face if she would be a Power for Peace. On all sides we hear the cry for trained leaders. This afternoon we're going to try to show you how the Church is facing this problem in our Diocese.

Another vital problem, not only in America but in the world, is that of minority groups. To bring us information about what the Church is doing for one of these groups—the Indian—the Rev. Vine Deloria—has traveled all the way from South Dakota.

In a short meeting of this kind of course we can only hope to start your thinking, and trust that your interest will be sufficiently aroused to continue your thinking, and plan your action after you go home.

In planning any action for the Church today we are coming to realize more and more the importance of all churches working together, and we have on our program two people who are well qualified to tell us how the Church may be a Power for Peace through cooperation.

It is our hope that, when this meeting is over, every person who has attended will be thoroughly convinced that it is his task to help the Church in being A Power for Peace. In our effort no doubt we shall come to appreciate the timeliness of the subject chosen by the Woman's Auxiliary, for emphasis at the next Triennial—"Strength to Build." What shall we be asked to help build? You will find a positive answer in the four subjects around which the

whole meeting in Philadelphia next Sept. 10-20 will be planned,—
 The Christian Faith
 The Christian Home
 The Christian World
 World Mission of the Christian Church

In your reading and program planning will you keep these things in mind? Take care of the little green leaflet in your packet given you when you registered. Use frequently the two prayers in the center of this leaflet. You will find that the first is for the mission of the Church in her corporate life; the second is for individuals who make up her corporate life. Both are necessary if we would actually bring to pass the high potential of The Mission of the Church as a Power for Peace.

The Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, Diocese of North Carolina, held its annual meeting in St. Timothy's Church, Wilson, April 30-May 1, beginning at 10:45 A. M.

The Rev. J. Q. Beckwith read the opening prayers.

The President declared the 64th Annual Meeting to be in session. Greetings were extended by Mrs. C. L. Blackburn of Wilson and the response given by Mrs. W. H. Hambly of Salisbury.

The Vice President, Mrs. R. T. B. Little, took the chair while the president gave her annual message. She said this meeting was a unique one in that it had no space for even one report.

The Executive Board as a body was then introduced to the delegates and given an opportunity to say anything they wished in regard to their particular departments.

The treasurer, Mrs. R. H. Boulogny, gave her report and recommended that the budget for \$8000 be accepted at this meeting and itemized in the fall; seconded by Mrs. Thomas and carried. The balance on hand at the close of the year was \$3298.08. This amount includes an accumulation of monies toward the salary of a negro social worker and also \$600 for the Triennial fund.

It was moved that these allocations be adopted; seconded and carried.

Mrs. Holmes as secretary of Christian Education spoke beautifully of her work in this department and expressed her earnest appreciation of the hearty cooperation shown. She feels that we have awakened to what the Educational work really means. She announced that the theme of the next Triennial meeting is to be "Strength to Build" and that the subjects chosen for mission study next year are to be:

India.

The Christian and Race.

The United Thank Offering Custodian, Mrs. Hairston, reported the amount for the fall to be \$7142; the total on hand to date for the Triennial \$32,453.33, with another offering to be taken before the date set for the General Convention.

Mrs. Clarkson, as Personnel chairman, said there was one call which only the women could answer—a call for help at the Thompson Orphanage. Women workers are needed there—women of the highest type. She made an earnest appeal to the women of the Diocese to ask their own parishes if any woman or women were willing to do this work. It is a joy to be a mother to the motherless, she said.

Miss Emma Hall, as Interracial chairman, said she had just come to bring a message from the recent National Executive Board meeting and that it could be given in three words;—Food Reconstruction and Prayer. She urged us to do all we could for the starving peoples of the world and said that already seven million dollars had been raised for Reconstruction and Advance. The theme for the Triennial is from Hymn 494 and it is to be sung at

the opening of the General Convention. She recommended that just two lines of that hymn be used by every woman as a prayer every day until the time of the meeting.

As a member of the Executive Council, Mrs. Bourne said she considered it a great privilege to have served in that capacity for a year and that she did not understand how anyone could accept such a responsibility without this preparation.

Our Church Periodical Club chairman, Miss Lillie Hill, made an appeal for books, books, books. Every branch president in the Auxiliary was asked to send in to her the name of their Church Periodical Club secretary.

The president then introduced Miss Laura Clark as our missionary in China and one for whom we have offered prayers during the past trying years. Miss Clark expressed in a few words her appreciation of the work which the Auxiliary has done for the Diocese in China in which she has been working; that we have also helped with the Grace Chen educational fund. She told us that Bishop Chen expects to come to the meeting in Philadelphia. She expressed her thanks for our prayers and thoughts.

Mrs. Peoples said here that the girls from St. Mary's House, Greensboro, are corresponding with Grace Chen and that Grace writes as though she already knows us all.

Noon Day prayers were said by the Rev. John Drake of St. Paul's Church, Winston-Salem.

Mrs. W. J. Gordon's meditation on the Woman's Auxiliary Prayer was the high-light of the morning session and left us all with much food for thought. She said the meditation was a challenge on these three questions: What does it mean? What does it mean to **Me**? What am I going to do about it? The spiritual is the basis of our work in the Auxiliary.

Mrs. Peoples spoke of another thing done at the Executive Board meeting; That the board had decided to send in the name of Mrs. Francis O. Clarkson of Charlotte, as our choice for a candidate for membership on the National Board and expressed the hope that hers would be one of the twenty-four names selected at the Triennial meeting.

Mrs. Bouigny, as chairman of the Credentials committee, reported a quorum present.

The president announced that the offering from the evening service would go to the Rev. Vine Deloria for his work in South Dakota.

The incoming President and the United Thank Offering Custodian go by virtue of their office.

Mrs. W. S. Holmes moved that the three names receiving the largest number of votes go as delegates and five others elected from nominations to be made from the floor go as alternates. Seconded by Mrs. Clarkson; carried.

The meeting adjourned for luncheon at the Cherry Hotel at one o'clock.

Afternoon Session Beginning at 2:30

Two verses of Hymn 261 were sung, followed by a prayer for use at the time of the election of officers.

The president called for nominations from the floor; there were none.

Mrs. U. T. Holmes moved that the slate as submitted by the nominating committee be accepted and that the secretary be instructed to cast the ballot, making the election unanimous. Seconded by Miss Hill; carried.

Delegates to the Triennial: The following nominations were made from the floor:

Mrs. F. O. Clarkson, Charlotte; Mrs. J. W. Huddle, Chapel Hill; Mrs. Irving Carlyle, Winston-Salem; Mrs. Geo. Watts Carr, Durham; Mrs. T. P. Thomas, Wilson; Mrs. Thos. J. Pearsall, Rocky Mount; Mrs. F. S. Spruill, Jr., Rocky Mount.

Miss Hill moved that the nominations be closed; seconded; carried.

The next in order was our program for the training of future leaders in the Diocese and the speaker for St. Mary's School, Raleigh, was Miss Myrtle Alston of Henderson. She told us of the organization of a Student Auxiliary there.

A skit by students from the Woman's College at Greensboro was given and gave a clear idea of the work being done there.

Miss Martha Hinkle represented the Youth movement in the Diocese.

The meeting is always happy to listen to Mrs. Whisnant's account of the doings at the Thompson Orphanage and her report this year was as interesting as usual. She reported a gift of a 169-acre farm from the Diocese of Eastern Carolina.

In speaking of Vade Mecum, the Rev. Mr. Smythe said that registrations were coming in steadily and they are to accept four people from every parish and two from each mission until they reach the goal of 80 persons. He urged immediate registration. There is to be a wonderful staff of instructors this year. He told something of the twenty-five year development program and said the camp was rapidly expanding.

Mrs. Lamb, chairman of the committee on elections, gave the following report:

The meeting adjourned for the afternoon.

At 8 P. M. the service was a fitting climax to a busy day and the church was filled with interested men and women who listened avidly to the Rev. Mr. Deloria's inspiring message. The work being done for Indian girls in St. Mary's School, Springfield, S. D., was made clear to us and deepened our interest therein and our spiritual lives were strengthened by all he had to say. He expressed his great appreciation for the help given by the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese.

Wednesday Morning, May 1st

7:30—Celebration of the Holy Communion with the Rt. Rev. E. A. Penick as celebrant, assisted by the Rev. J. Q. Beckwith, rector of St. Timothy's parish. At this service the Roll of Remembrance was read and the United Thank Offering presented.

At 9:30 the meeting reconvened in the church and the last two verses of Hymn 261 were sung. Prayers were read by the Rev. Mr. Beckwith.

Mrs. Peoples announced that the offering taken at the evening service amounted to \$159 which was to be presented to the Rev. Mr. Deloria for his work.

The United Thank Offering Custodian reported that the offering at the 7:30 service in the morning amounted to \$78.28; the total spring offering was \$6612.08.

The President again presented the Rev. Mr. Deloria who told us more of what he hoped to do for the boys of his Diocese; also that St. Mary's School for girls must close for three months this summer unless \$500 was forthcoming to defray expenses. Mrs. Rogers moved that we turn over \$500 from our reserve fund to Mr. Deloria for this emergency after he has talked it over with his Bishop. Seconded by Mrs. Hall and carried.

Program

Miss Mary King, president of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Province of Sewanee, gave us an inspiring address on The Church a Power for Peace—in the Province.

She was followed by the Rev. E. J. Arnold, Executive Secretary of the North Carolina Council of Churches, who spoke of the Power for Peace through cooperation.

Mrs. F. O. Clarkson told of the relation of the Federal Council to the program of our Triennial.

Mr. Arnold then told us of the work and vital importance of the World Council of Churches.

Reports of Committees

The report of the committee on resolutions was given by Mrs. U. T. Holmes as follows:

Whereas; The food shortages in Europe are so acute as to call for immediate and drastic action by our Government and self-denial by the American people,

BE IT RESOLVED; That this convention send letters to the proper authorities in Washington urging speed in sending supplies, and promising our cooperation in any method of rationing or similar control that will assure more supplies of the needed commodities.

Mrs. Holmes recommended that this resolution be adopted; seconded; carried.

Whereas; It has been felt for a number of years that our procedure in electing delegates and alternates to the Triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary is somewhat confusing; And Whereas, in some Dioceses the United Thank Offering Custodian, while she is always sent by her Diocese to present its offering, is not necessarily one of its official delegates,

BE IT RESOLVED; That this convention ask our president to appoint a committee to study this question and to make recommendations to improve our procedure.

Mrs. Holmes recommended that this resolution be adopted; seconded; carried.

Whereas; Many parishes feel the need of help in planning devotions for their meetings,

BE IT RESOLVED; That this convention ask the National Executive Board to prepare and send to all Dioceses material and suggestions that will make the worship part of their meetings more meaningful.

Mrs. Holmes recommended that this resolution be adopted; seconded; carried.

BE IT RESOLVED; That the president and nominating committee make sure that the branches understand our rules regarding the election of officers, and stimulate interest on the part of the branches in securing a more democratic expression of the mind of the Auxiliary.

Mrs. Holmes recommended that this resolution be adopted; seconded; carried.

BE IT RESOLVED; That our president be authorized to take action for us on the Bill on Child Welfare recommended by Dr. Ellen Winston for our support.

Mrs. Holmes recommended that this resolution be adopted; seconded; carried.

Mrs. W. J. Gordon read the report of the Findings and Courtesy committee.

The minutes of the meeting were read.

The Bishop's address was a beautiful one and made us all eager to accept our task as women of the Church.

Noon-day prayers were said by the Rev. Lansing Hicks of Grace Church, Weldon.

The new officers were installed.

Benediction.

The new president, Mrs. H. C. Bourne, then declared the 64th Annual Meeting adjourned.

In making a final report of three years of effort in an office, there is inevitably a realization of having come short of the would-be goal. No matter what the program, nor how well planned, failure faces one; perhaps, the higher the intent and purpose, the more complete the disappointment when an appraisal is attempted. Probably the immensity of the subject THROUGH WORLD EVANGELISM TO WORLD FELLOWSHIP IN CHRIST dwarfed the best-intentioned efforts. We have had wonderful helps in the splendid literature sent out by the National Council and our women have availed themselves of it. From District reports, we gather that all secretaries have been diligent in assembling and distributing the pamphlets from "281." During the past year, I have sent to all branches the tracts and pamphlets prepared by the Reconstruction and Advance Commission. Besides this, I have prepared a study on the Life of St. Paul which was distributed at district meetings and sent to those requesting copies. I have also had a column in the North Carolina Churchman each month. At the time of the fall district meetings, opportunity was given for the discussion of materials for study. I feel that we have gotten a firmer grasp on the reality of the educational department in the life of the women of the Church, these past three years.

As we go into a new Triennium, we are heartened and stimulated because of the Watchword: STRENGTH TO BUILD. We must expect to give more time to "searching the scriptures" and to "fervent praying," looking unto Jesus, the "Author and the Finisher of our faith."

Let us, with St. Paul, say, "I can do all things through Christ, who strengtheneth me."

REPORT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

As I look over the reports of the year's work in Christian Social Relations, I cannot help but have a real feeling of pride and gratitude for the work our Auxiliary has done. Especially as I am im-

pressed with the number of study groups held with other churches, which indicates a real Christian fellowship.

The various branches have supported the following Diocesan and National objectives: Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief, Chinese Relief, Victory Clothing Drive for Europe and Asia, Russian Kits and Church Christmas Packages.

The local work in the Diocese was splendid and consisted of contributing to the Salvation Army, Red Cross and Community Chests; assisting with Vacation Bible School, Teen-age Centers, Girl Scout work and Day-School Nurseries; sending boxes to County Homes, Supplies and clothing to the Training School for negro girls, Christmas cheer to hospitals at Fort Bragg, baskets to the needy, flowers to local hospitals and clothes to needy school children in public schools; and co-operating with other churches in introducing the Bible in public schools.

The Auxiliary branches have also continued their loyal support of the Thompson Orphanage with their gifts of money, clothing, etc.

During the coming year, much of our war work will cease, but we must not take this to mean that our responsibilities will be lessened. If anything, they will be increased. During the war years, when all of us were fired with patriotic fervor, we gave and did as a matter of routine, but with the coming of peace, our efforts will be of a more thoughtful and sacrificial nature and we, as Christian women, will have a real opportunity to show our Social Relations by our thoughtfulness of and consideration for our fellowman. Most especially do we want to prove ourselves Christians by doing for our overseas neighbors, who have undergone so many hardships and who need our help now, both spiritually and financially, and will need it for sometime to come.

REPORT OF THE SUPPLY DEPARTMENT

It is difficult to give a definite report of the supply department for the term of one year as the major part of the work is the filling of allotments sent by the National Supply Secretary, Miss Dorothy Stabler. These are received in the early fall and completed as soon as possible.

A total of 511 new garments and house hold articles have been purchased and sent to Fork Mission Scottsburg, Va., and to the Boy's Home, Covington, Va. A check for \$50.00 was also sent to the Boy's Home to purchase dispensary supplies.

In addition to what has been sent Fork Mission and the Boy's Home our allotment included 56 sheets and 20 other garments and articles that have not yet been secured. Every effort is being made to purchase these through the supply department and also through the institutions who likewise have been unable to make similar purchases and which are more than glad to wait until they can be obtained.

A check for \$200.00 was sent to Dr. Lewis B. Franklin to purchase supplies for St. Timothy's Hospital in Liberia.

The sum of \$125.00 was sent to Dr. Franklin for the Supply Secretaries Gift Fund which will be recognized as the way personal gifts to missionaries are now made. I wish it were possible for every auxiliary member to have the privilege of reading the letters received acknowledging the Christmas gifts this fund makes possible.

The above report is what your gifts to the supply work have made it possible for your diocesan supply secretary to do in your name but what has been of most importance is the packing and sending used garments that has been done in almost every branch of the auxiliary.

Miss G. Bernice Holland, superintendent of St. Mary's School for Indian girls has been delighted and very much encouraged by your response to her appeal to help outfit her pupils and she asks your continued help.

Mrs. Bob Smith at Fork Mission also reports that her mission has been more than grateful for the additional boxes of used clothing that she has received.

The boxes sent to Miss Lillie Hill enable her to accomplish almost unbelievable things through her Thrift Sale and Mrs. Whisnant of the Thompson Orphanage writes most appreciative letters concerning the help used clothing is toward keeping "her family well dressed."

I am deeply grateful for the confidence you have placed in me by electing me your Supply Secretary and assure you that your co-operation and interest have made the work of this office a very happy privilege.

St. Luke's Hospital in Manila alone has already received 1,100 books and magazines. How many of these did your Club help to buy?

Few reports have come in as much work was done through civic clubs, but this should have been reported.

Appropriate books and magazines are asked for all sorts of institutions, subscriptions to magazines, Bibles, testaments. Just as I write this an encouraging note comes from the C. P. C. secretary of St. Paul's, Winston-Salem, of a fine donation for replacement of books in our missions destroyed by war. Who will be next?

Will you Secretaries not help me to carry a fine report to the Triennial from The Church Periodical Club in the Diocese of North Carolina?

Our Lord's last command was to "GO YE." Shall we go to these war torn missions in the form of a Bible, some helpful book or magazine?

REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY CORRESPONDENT

For the past three years this department has conformed to the policy of the National Council by which each diocese assumes responsibility, in personal ways, for the missionaries from that diocese. The general plan made by Mrs. Bourne, my predecessor, has been followed, and new ideas and suggestions followed as they have come to me from those interested in the growth of this work. Newsletters have been sent periodically to the District Correspondents who have passed on the information to the Branch Correspondents. An increasing number of letters from the workers shows a real appreciation of the interest being shown by those of us at home. The Rev. William J. Gordon, Jr., has been sending his own newsletters from Alaska during the past year; which have been received with great interest.

A file of all correspondence, reports, and information received and sent by me during the past three years has been kept and is available to my successor.

It is gratifying that the end of the war has brought the release of many of our missionaries who are now safe in this country.

Some vacancies in the missions fields have been filled, but there

is still need for more workers; and correspondents are asked to keep this need before their Auxiliary Branches and to be ready to help potential volunteers with information obtainable from the Church Missions House. A new "Calendar for Missions" should be ordered and used by every correspondent, each year.

Please note that, for the first time, a list of the missionaries to whom each district is asked to send the usual Christmas check for \$5.00 is printed in the Year Book. District correspondents should refer to this list before the fall meetings.

I am confident that this department can and will grow in a conception of what it can mean in the life of our diocese.

We are asking each branch of the Auxiliary to make an appeal this year for any of their members who like work with children and are interested in such a position to write to the Superintendent, M. D. Whisnant, Thompson Orphanage, Charlotte, N. C.

Any women interested in other types of professional church work are asked to get in touch with the chairman and receive through her the material from the National Personnel Department.

REPORT OF REPRESENTATIVE ON THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL AND CHAIRMAN OF YOUTH WORK OF WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

The Youth Department of the Diocese is made up of three members of the Diocesan Council, with other members from the Diocese at large and representatives from the young people serving as associate members.

A useful precedent has been established whereby one of the two representatives from the Woman's Auxiliary on the Diocesan Council will be placed by the Bishop on the Youth Department. The

President of the Auxiliary will in turn appoint this representative to serve as Chairman of Youth Work in the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese. During the past three years I have served in these offices, which form a connecting link between the effort of the whole church to promote work among young people and the duty of the Auxiliary to help in this effort.

Mrs. E. F. Lucas of Greensboro now succeeds me as Representative of the Auxiliary on the Council and a Chairman of Youth Work in the Diocesan Auxiliary. If you are a secretary of Youth Work you should write to her giving your name and address so that you will be on her mailing list for information and instruction. Also send your name to your district secretary of Youth Work.

There is not a proportionately large amount of organized Youth Work in our Diocese. However this does not necessarily indicate a lack of spiritual vitality among our young people. In many parishes, especially the smaller ones, they are an integral part of the whole life of the church, taking part in its worship and service. A good church school in these cases can provide the necessary opportunity for study.

There are many places where there is an opportunity and a need for organized Young People's work, and the Auxiliary in these parishes should do all in its power to help in starting and sustaining the work. It is the duty of the secretaries of Young People's Work to take the lead in giving this support.

The Diocesan Council meets four times a year at the residence of the Bishop. During my three year term as your representative on the Council I have attended all but one of these meetings. It is sometime felt that the women contribute little to the deliberation of this body but at the very least they are informed at the meetings concerning the activities of the church in its Diocesan and National organization. This enables them to bring the Auxiliary into closer cooperation with the objectives of the whole body of the church. It also gives the Council an idea of the work we are doing and the help that can be expected from us.

send letters to the proper authorities in Washington urging speed in sending supplies, and promising our cooperation in any method of rationing or similar control that will assure more supplies of the needed commodities.

Whereas: It has been felt for a number of years that our procedure in electing delegates and alternates to the Triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary is somewhat confusing, *and whereas:* in some dioceses the United Thank Offering custodian, while she is always sent by her diocese to present its Offering, is not necessarily one of its official delegates, *Be it resolved* that this Convention ask our president to appoint a committee to study this question and to make recommendations to improve our procedure.

Whereas: Many parishes feel the need of help in planning devotions for their meetings, *Be it resolved* that this Convention ask the National Executive Board to prepare and send to all dioceses material and suggestions that will make the worship part of their meetings more meaningful.

Be it resolved that the President and nominating committee make sure that the Branches understand our rules regarding the election of officers, and stimulate interest on the part of the Branches in securing a more democratic expression of the mind of the Auxiliary.

Be it resolved that our president be authorized to take action for us on the Bill on Child Welfare recommended by Dr. Ellen Winston for our support.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINDINGS AND COURTESY

There has been a real joy in coming together in an Annual Meeting after the years of uncertainties, sorrows and thanksgivings; to meet in this lovely church in the Easter season when nature herself is expressing the glory of God; and to share in this helpful, interesting program. We truly feel that "it is good that we have been here."

We have gathered together what seems to us the heart of the meeting under two headings—those things which challenge us for the future, and those conditions which encourage us and for which we give thanks.

Challenges:

1. Greater gifts for the Reconstruction and Advance Fund, and an effort to reach those parishes which have not yet had any share in this opportunity.

Our responsibility as housewives, in the desperate need for food in Europe and the East, for books to help restore hospitals and libraries, and above all, for prayer for our suffering brethren.

2. In the opportunities for training future leaders.

3. In the encouragement of minority groups. This has been

forcefully emphasized by the Rev. Vine Deloria as he presented the opportunities for work among the Indians, especially through Christian Schools, and told of their response to the message of the Gospel. This is the Church's opportunity to heal the wounds inflicted by certain actions of the State.

4. In an appeal for house mothers at the Thompson Orphanage, the remarkable fact being that there is not an Episcopalian serving there in this capacity at the present time.

5. In the searching words of Miss Mary King concerning our personnel opportunities and responsibilities in the Province.

6. In the call for cooperation among Christians of all communions, as shown by the North Carolina Council of Churches, the Federal Council and the World Council. Like charity, this should begin at home in a spirit of unity and understanding in our various communities.

7. The challenge through a study of the Auxiliary Prayer that the personal life of each woman of the Auxiliary be so thankfully related to Christ as Saviour and King, that by "praying fervently, laboring diligently and giving liberally" she may be used to reach others for the extension of His Kingdom.

We record with thanksgiving:

1. The progress of our general work. Tangible evidence of this is seen in the balance of \$1500 in the treasury, and a splendid increase in the United Thank Offering.

2. The "merciful Providence" which has kept Laura Clark during her years of internment, and has brought her safely home.

3. Our sense of privilege in sharing in the work of the Church in China, by having helped in the endowment fund which made possible the consecration of Bishop Chen, thereby enabling his diocese to have Episcopal supervision when the American Bishop was recalled—and for our continued sharing in his family life through the Grace Chen Educational Fund.

4. The beginning of an organized branch of the Woman's Auxiliary at St. Mary's School.

5. The lovely spirit of home life at the Thompson Orphanage under the care of "Father and Mother Whisnant."

6. The opportunity of helping give the Indian girls in South Dakota an opportunity for Christian Education.

We wish to thank the rector of this parish, the Rev. J. Q. Beckwith, and the committees of the Auxiliary who have made such careful, thoughtful preparations for this meeting, for their remarkable efficiency in carrying out their plans, and for their gracious hospitality. We thank them for inviting us to the lovely town of Wilson. We wish to express our appreciation to the management of Hotel Cherry and to the women of the Methodist and of the Christian Church for their cooperation in providing appetizing meals in these days of difficult housekeeping. We thank the Rev. Mr. Deloria for making the long journey to this diocese; to thank Miss King for giving us the privilege of having the president of the Province in our midst. We value the contribution that they, and all others who have shared in this program, have made.

We thank Bishop Penick for his faithful attendance at our Annual Meetings and for the challenge and spirit of encouragement he always brings. We particularly appreciate the presence of so many of the younger clergy of the diocese.

The retiring officers—the Vice President, Mrs. R. T. B. Little, the Educational Secretary, Mrs. W. S. Holmes and the secretary, Mrs. C. H. Cheatham, have given us generous and faithful service and we give them our sincere thanks.

We are deeply indebted to Mrs. Peoples for her three years of leadership under trying and abnormal war years. Not only has the Auxiliary been held together but it has gone forward, as is attested by this meeting. Truly she has given liberally of her thought and time and talents, of her spiritual insight and of her gracious personality. Her contribution to the last Triennial Meeting won her recognition in the Church at large, and we pray for her an ever-increasing usefulness in the extension of Christ's Kingdom, as she hands this gavel now to a worthy successor.

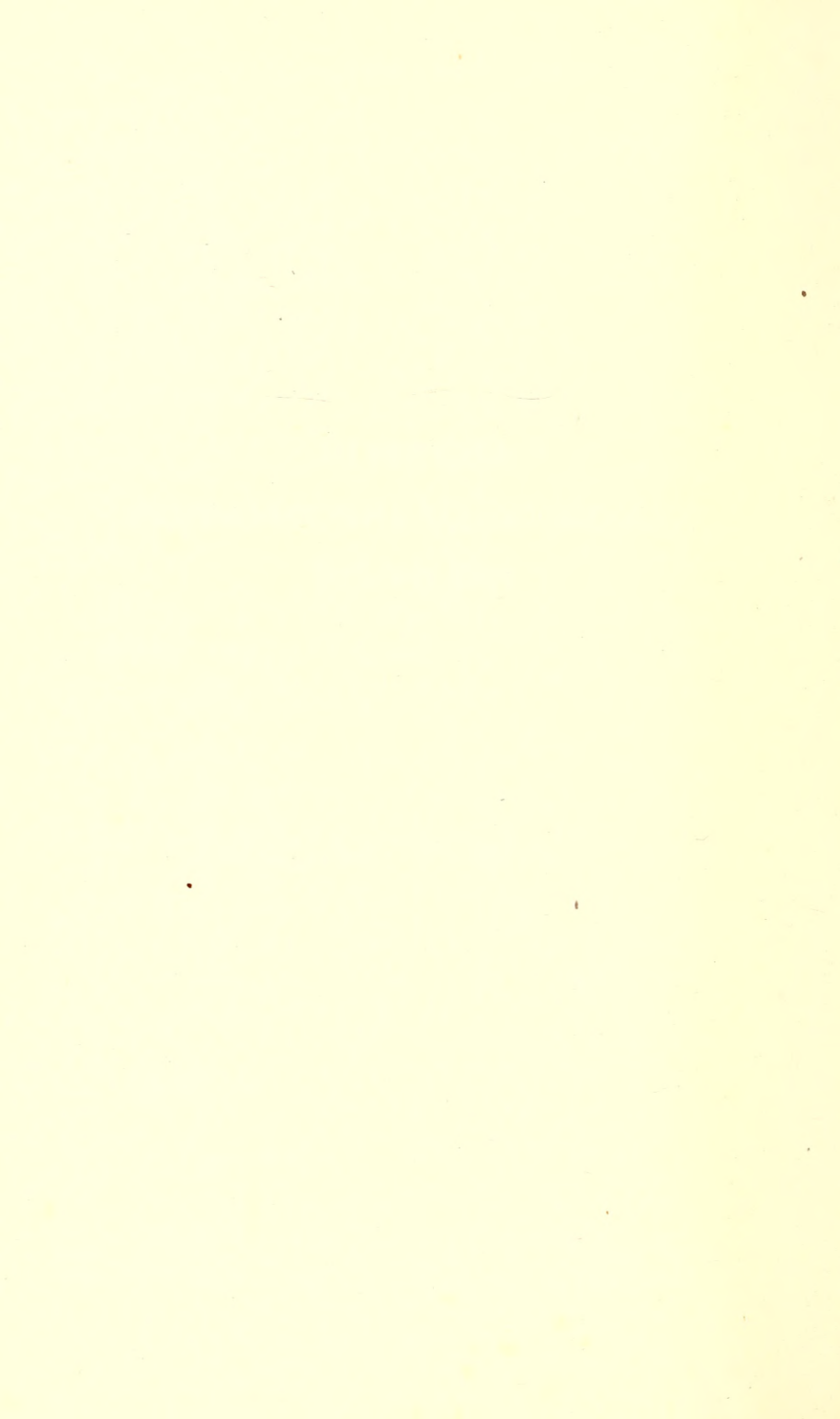

1. Plan Program for 1946-1947

Mimeographed Suggested Topics have been sent to each Branch Secretary by the Diocesan Secretary. It is important that you have planned a well balanced program of Worship, Study, Service, Gifts and Fellowship in the five fields of Action: the Parish, Community, Diocese, Nation, and World.

ITEMS SUGGESTED FOR CONSIDERATION IN PREPARING THE COUNCIL'S 1947 LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM

1. Adequate provision for the enforcement of the compulsory school attendance law through the State Department of Public Instruction.
2. Provision for modernizing the jail system and for bringing it up to approved minimum standards.

These two items are unfinished business on which we will want to continue to work until we secure constructive action.

3. More adequate provision for medical care and hospitalization.
4. Minimum wage and hour law.
5. Provision for financing cancer control clinics set up under the State Board of Health.

These are new items which need to be presented to your organization for study and action at your next state convention or executive board meeting.

6. Continued support of the program to provide adequate care and treatment of white and Negro feeble-minded children.

This item was included for continued support since no definite appropriation for buildings were included in the bills passed by the recent legislature. The reason for the failure to include specific appropriations was the uncertainty of building conditions at this time, and that may be taken care of by a special session of the Legislature.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be, "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

ARTICLE II

Object

The object of this organization shall be to help in carrying out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church. Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education and Christian Social Service.

ARTICLE III

Membership

The membership of this organization shall be composed of all Parish and Mission Branches within the Diocese.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: A President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of Christian Education, a Secretary of Christian Social Relations, a Secretary of Supply, a Custodian of United Thank Offering.

Section 2. These officers with the District Chairmen shall constitute the Executive Board and shall meet at least twice a year at the call of the President.

ARTICLE V

Duties of Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for. She shall also preside at meetings, and at every Annual Meeting shall address the Auxiliary. She shall make a report to the Diocesan Convention.

Section 2. The Vice-President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have specific duties to be decided in conference with the President.

Section 3. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist the President in preparing and having printed the Annual Report, and at each Annual Meeting shall make a report.

Section. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering and Box Work money, and shall make a report of same to the Annual Meeting. At the end of every fiscal year the Treasurer's accounts shall be verified by a public auditor. The Treasurer's report, as audited, shall be published in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Section 5. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Education shall promote and stimulate educational work in the branches of the Diocese by every means in her power, and carry out the program of the National Department of Religious Education.

Section. 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Relations shall co-operate with the Christian Social Relations Departments of the Diocese and the National Council, in the promotion of their plans and programs.

Section 7. The Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in the Spring and Fall of each year, and shall remit immediately for investment to the Treasurer of the National Council.

Section 8. The Secretary of Supply shall have charge of the work of the Supply Department.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. All Diocesan officers shall be elected for a term of three years. The Treasurer and the United Thank Offering Custodian to be elected at the first annual meeting after the Triennial; the President, Secretary of Supply, and Secretary of Christian Social Relations to be elected at the second annual meeting after the Triennial; the President to take office at the third annual meeting after the Triennial; Vice-President and Secretary of Christian Education to be elected at the third meeting after the Triennial.

Section 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President.

ARTICLE VII

Districts

Section 1. For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into districts.

Section 2. A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman duly elected by her District for a term of three years. In case of vacancy the Vice-Chairman shall serve as Chairman.

Section 3. Each District shall hold at least one and, if possible, two meetings a year.

ARTICLE VIII

Election of Diocesan Officers

Section 1. Prior to the Annual Meeting, the President shall appoint from the Executive Board a nominating committee of three who shall consider proposed nominees to fill the elective offices at the Meeting, and from the names suggested or considered the Committee shall recommend to the Meeting the nominees for such offices. The consent of the nominees shall be obtained by the Committee before making the recommendation. Nominations may be made from the floor of the Meeting by any delegate provided the consent of the nominee has been first obtained. A majority vote shall be required for all elections. In case there are more than two nominees for the same office and no candidate receives a majority vote, the name receiving the smallest number of votes shall be dropped from the ballot.

Section 2. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund for Calendar Year preceding the meeting.

ARTICLE IX

Finance

The Executive Committee in consultation with the Bishop shall prepare a budget for the year. The budget shall be presented to the branches for their support at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Section 2. From the total amount pledged towards the budget, one-half shall apply to the work of the National Council, one-half to the work of the Diocese.

Section 3. The United Thank Offering and contributions for the Supply Department shall be in addition to the payments on the budget.

ARTICLE X

Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present, provided a written copy of the proposed amendments has been filed with the Diocesan Secretary, and a notice of same mailed to each branch by the Secretary at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting.

BY-LAWS

The place and time of the Annual Meeting shall be approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

1. The order of Business for the Annual Meeting shall be arranged by the President and the Executive Committee.

2. Each Parish Branch having fifty members or less shall be represented by the Branch President and one other delegate (appointed by the President or elected by the Branch). The President, or her representative, and the delegates each has a vote. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the Branch to an additional delegate with power to vote.

3. Each Branch shall be assessed twenty-five cents per member to provide for Provincial Expenses, printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of Speakers, and other items necessary for the proper administration of this organization. This shall be known as the Central Fund.

4. One-fourth of the Branches having the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at the Annual Meeting. Five members shall constitute a quorum at the Executive Committee Meetings.

5. The Diocesan President shall appoint at the beginning of her second year of office the following Chairmen, to serve for three years: Chairman of Church Periodical Club; Interracial Chairman; Legislative Chairman; Missionary Correspondent; Chairman of Young Peoples' Work.

6. The District Officers shall correspond to the Diocesan Officers and shall be elected at the first meeting of the District after the Diocesan Annual Meeting.

The District Chairman shall appoint the following Chairmen, to serve for three years: (1) Church Periodical Club; (2) Prayer Partnership Correspondent; (3) Young Peoples' Work.

7. Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be the authority in all question of parliamentary law not covered by these By-Laws.

8. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates of any Annual Meeting.

OBJECTIVES OF WOMAN'S AUXILIARY BRANCHES 1947-48

"Give us, O God, the Strength to Build"

"Ye shall receive power after that the Holy Spirit is come upon you, and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth".

WORSHIP: Ye Shall be Witnesses of the Glory of God.

1. Observe at least four corporate Communion during the year.
2. Observe Intercessory Days with a corporate Communion or worship service.
January 6, Feast of Epiphany
February 2, Feast of Purification
3. Have a presentation service for the United Thank Offering in Spring and Fall.
4. Observe prayer days referred to in the Calendar of the Dept. of Christian Education.
5. Plan devotions for your meetings so that they are an integral part of the program of the meeting.

STUDY: Ye Shall be Witnesses of the Truth of God.

1. Plan a program of study for the year in accordance with the recommendations of the Diocesan Secretary of Christian Education.
2. Plan each meeting to have each officer present current information concerning the work of her department in parish, diocese, nation or world.
3. Promote Adult Bible Study Classes.

SERVICE: Ye Shall be Witnesses of the Love of God.

1. Participate in campaigns for overseas relief.
2. Support the Thompson Orphanage and St. Mary's School for Indian Girls, South Dakota with gifts and supplies.
3. Support such plans for Christian Social Service as are suggested by the Dept. of Christian Social Relations.
4. Respond to requests from Diocesan Supply Department.
5. Cooperate with local youth organizations.
6. Encourage the acceptance by your vestry of the full Church's Program Quota for your congregation.

GIFTS: Ye Shall be Witnesses of the Merciful Bounty of God.

1. Stress the spiritual significance of the U. T. O. and the presentation at meetings of information concerning its use in the mission field.
2. Contribute funds or furnishings for improvised altar or for building at Camp Delany, the camp site for Negroes.
3. Consider the possibility of increasing your pledge in December to the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary budget of Jan. 1—Dec. 31, 1948.

FELLOWSHIP: Ye Shall be Witnesses of the Fellowship of the Family of God.

1. Re-awaken the interest of inactive members.
2. Reach out for new members.
3. Sponsor the organization of new branches.
4. Strive for mutual strengthening of Negro and white branches by closer cooperation in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary.
5. Work for greater understanding between races, classes and creeds.

ANALYSIS OF YEAR OF WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF DIOCESE

1. Fiscal year of Diocese and branches runs Jan. 1 to Dec. 31 because it must co-incide with National Council fiscal year.
2. Year of active study and action runs from 1st meeting in Fall (Sept.) to last meeting before summer recess (June). Reason: It must conform to the plans and material sent out from National headquarters, and to the Diocesan Annual Meeting which must be held in the favorable weather of Spring.
3. Summer is preparation period for activities to follow—it is the inactive first part of a new year of study and action.
4. New officers should be elected at a branch meeting prior to Annual Diocesan Meeting. Reasons: (a) New officers are taken into consideration in the election of delegates to the Annual Meeting, (b) New officers' names can be given on report of the year's study and action for publishing in year book.
5. New officers should be installed at last meeting before summer recess (June meeting). A few branches meet during summer. Their officers should also be installed at end of June meeting.
6. Officers installed at June meeting spend summer preparing for coming year of activity. Program of Christian Education should be prepared during this time.
7. New president presides at 1st Fall meeting (Sept.). For branches meeting during summer she presides at July meeting.

8. Report blanks are sent out to branches in March Diocesan president's letter. Reports cover period from previous July 1st to May 1st (as late in year as possible and yet in time for publishing in year book.) Reports are mailed back to District Chairman and Diocesan president in May. List of recently elected officers sent in on report then becomes correct in year book for longest period of year possible.
9. Year book is sent out in August, before if possible.
10. New treasurer is actually installed in middle of fiscal year, along with other officers, but this is much easier for her than taking office in January when she would immediately have to set up new pledges and budget.
11. Annual Diocesan Meeting is the middle of April. This conforms to date of Diocesan Convention of the Church, and to the Bishop's schedule. Year's reports are not available for Diocesan officers for Annual Meeting, but "reports" at this meeting could consist of plans for the future and a general picture of work.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION FOR EACH AUXILIARY MEMBER

Three questions concerning Christian Education need to be discussed and considered: What is Christian Education? What is each woman's responsibility in Christian Education? What is the program of Christian Education for the Auxiliary for the coming year?

Christian Education permeates all of the worship, business, study and service of our Auxiliary life. Essential to this conception of Christian Education is the growth of the individual. You and I are being trained in Christian living.

Secretaries of Christian Education and all other officers assume the task of preparing well balanced and integrated meetings that give each of us opportunity for growth along the Christian way of life through worship, study, service and fellowship.

Few of us, however, are officers—what then is each woman's share of responsibility in Christian Education if each is to grow?

Attendance at meetings, listening to programs of talk and study is not enough. Too often we merely expose ourselves to Christian Education. Occasional moments of participation as speakers and leaders, occasional turns at service is not enough. We all know that we learn to do by doing, but this "doing" must be daily if we are to really learn. Exercising our vote and voice in meetings is not enough. We give our support to group action. There is grave danger that we are misusing the organized body of Woman's Auxiliary as corporate group study and action in place of individual study and action.

Each of us should receive and take from the meetings the help and information offered; ponder well how this help and information can be used by each of us; then act in daily practice that each of us may gain skill in Christian living.

Here are three suggested steps necessary if you and I are to receive aid in Christian living from our meetings:

1. Preparation for meetings

Daily personal prayer and meditation for guidance and thankfulness.

Know the planned program. Use the yearbook. Know business that is to be transacted.

Read in preparation for the programs.

Attend meetings with the intention of receiving help that will lead to personal study and action.

2. Participation in our meetings

Let us be completely receptive.

Note questions and suggestions we personally wish to follow up.

Making notes is a good way to help us remember.

Note requests of service, gifts, action that you personally will consider.

Let us grow away from practices of taking turns and letting others do the services.

Share our thoughts and questions in the meeting.

If we have really prepared we can contribute. Timidity frequently is a matter of ignorance.

3. Follow up the meetings

This step is perhaps the most necessary and vital, for in it the individual really grows.

Put inspiration and information into action.

Read further on subjects discussed. Church papers will give invaluable help. Interpret secular literature in a true Christian light.

Comply with requests, serve and pray for the success of our work.

For this year's study and action we have been turning our attention toward seeking the Strength to Build a better world. For the next two years may we find such growing Spiritual, Moral and Mental strength that this better world need no longer be a dream, but be begun as an actuality.

If we do feel a deep concern over the world. If we admit that each of us shares the responsibility for the world's chaos and therefore the equal responsibility for making a better world. If we

humbly acknowledge that we have followed the desires of our own hearts. If we recognize that God will build a fine world if we allow Him to use us. Then we accept the urgent need to pray, study and act as individual instruments of God.

There are four areas for study and action; The Christian Faith, The Christian Home and Family, The Christian World, and The World Mission of the Christian Church. Within these four areas we find summed up our failures in Christian Living but we also find hope of future success. From these areas and through them we will find that God will give us the Strength to Build a better world. . "Ye shall receive power after that the Holy Spirit is come upon you, and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth".

Let us, with humble and contrite hearts, sincerely and earnestly examine these four areas over and over so that we may each be a witness and a builder of God's world.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be, "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

ARTICLE II

Object

The object of this organization shall be to help in carrying out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church. Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education and Christian Social Service.

ARTICLE III

Membership

The membership of this organization shall be composed of all Parish and Mission Branches within the Diocese.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: A President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of Christian Education, a Secretary of Christian Social Relations, a Secretary of Supply, a Custodian of United Thank Offering.

Section 2. These officers with the District Chairmen, members of the Executive Council and Chairmen of Standing Committees shall constitute the Executive Board and shall meet at least twice a year at the call of the President.

ARTICLE V

Duties of Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for. She shall also preside at meetings, and at every Annual Meeting shall address the Auxiliary. She shall make a report to the Diocesan Convention.

Section 2. The Vice-President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have specific duties to be decided in conference with the President.

Section 3. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist the President in preparing and having printed the Annual Report, and at each Annual Meeting shall make a report.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering and Box Work money, and shall make a report of same to the Annual Meeting. At the end of every fiscal year the Treasurer's accounts shall be verified by a public auditor. The Treasurer's report, as audited, shall be published in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Section 5. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Education shall promote and stimulate educational work in the branches of the Diocese by every means in her power, and carry out the program of the National Department of Religious Education.

Section 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Relations shall co-operate with the Christian Social Relations Departments of the Diocese and the National Council, in the promotion of their plans and programs.

Section 7. The Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in the Spring and Fall of each year, and shall remit immediately for investment to the Treasurer of the National Council.

Section 8. The Secretary of Supply shall have charge of the work of the Supply Department.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. All Diocesan officers shall be elected for a term of three years. The Treasurer and the United Thank Offering Custodian to be elected at the first annual meeting after the Triennial; the President, Secretary of Supply, and Secretary of Christian Social Relations to be elected at the second annual meeting after the Triennial; the President to take office at the third annual meeting after the Triennial; Vice-President and Secretary of Christian Education to be elected at the third meeting after the Triennial.

Section 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President.

ARTICLE VII

Districts

Section 1. For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into districts.

Section 2. A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman duly elected by her District for a term of three years. In case of vacancy the Vice-Chairman shall serve as Chairman.

Section 3. Each District shall hold at least one and, if possible, two meetings a year.

ARTICLE VIII

Election of Diocesan Officers

Section 1. Prior to the Annual Meeting, the President shall appoint from the Executive Board a nominating committee of three who shall consider proposed nominees to fill the elective offices at the Meeting, and from the names suggested or considered the Committee shall recommend to the Meeting the nominees for such offices. The consent of the nominees shall be obtained by the Committee before making the recommendation. Nominations may be made from the floor of the Meeting by any delegate provided the consent of the nominee has been first obtained. A majority vote shall be required for all elections. In case there are more than two nominees for the same office and no candidate receives a majority vote, the name receiving the smallest number of votes shall be dropped from the ballot.

Section 2. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund for Calendar Year preceding the meeting.

ARTICLE IX

Finance

The Executive Committee in consultation with the Bishop shall prepare a budget for the year. The budget shall be presented to the branches for their support at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Section 2. From the total amount pledged towards the budget, one-half shall apply to the work of the National Council, one-half to the work of the Diocese.

Section 3. The United Thank Offering and contributions for the Supply Department shall be in addition to the payments on the budget.

ARTICLE X

Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present, provided a written copy of the proposed amendments has been filed with the Diocesan Secretary, and a notice of same mailed to each branch by the Secretary at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting.

BY-LAWS

The place and time of the Annual Meeting shall be approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

1. The order of Business for the Annual Meeting shall be arranged by the President and the Executive Committee.

2. Each Parish Branch having fifty members or less shall be represented by the Branch President and one other delegate (appointed by the President or elected by the Branch). The President, or her representative, and the delegates each has a vote. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the Branch to an additional delegate with power to vote.

3. Each Branch shall be assessed twenty-five cents per member to provide for Provincial Expenses, printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of Speakers, and other items necessary for the proper administration of this organization. This shall be known as the Central Fund.

4. One-fourth of the Branches having the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at the Annual Meeting. Five members shall constitute a quorum at the Executive Committee Meetings.

5. The Diocesan President shall appoint at the beginning of her second year of office the following Chairmen, to serve for three years: Chairman of Church Periodical Club; Interracial Chairman; Legislative Chairman; Missionary Correspondent; Chairman of Young Peoples' Work.

6. The District Officers shall correspond to the Diocesan Officers and shall be elected at the first meeting of the District after the Diocesan Annual Meeting.

The District Chairman shall appoint the following Chairmen, to serve for three years: (1) Church Periodical Club; (2) Prayer Partnership Correspondent; (3) Young Peoples' Work.

7. Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be the authority in all questions of parliamentary law not covered by these By-Laws.

8. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates of any Annual Meeting.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

65th ANNUAL MEETING — WOMAN'S AUXILIARY
Church of the Holy Innocents, Henderson, April 15, 1947

As your President I extend greetings to you at this the 65th Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina. The last time we met here in the Church of the Holy Innocents in 1932 we were celebrating the 50th anniversary of our founding. A reading of the records of that meeting recalls many of the Saints of God who made an imprint on the life of the Auxiliary in our Diocese. They set a high standard for us, with a basic belief that we must always go on "from strength to strength in a life of perfect service."

The Triennial Meeting of 1946 gave us the theme for three years: "Give us O God the Strength to Build", and sent out a Message to us which contains this passage—"God is Power and they that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength". It is this passage which gives us the keynote for our 1947 Diocesan Annual Meeting: God is Power. God is Power translated through the church and through us as members of the church. He is Power translated through us by means of our sacramental life within the church, as symbolized by the early celebration of the Holy Communion when we present our United Thank Offering. God is Power through the missionary program of the church, as will be made evident by the message which our speakers on the program bring to us. God is Power by means of souls who are themselves beacon lights of His truth—and by means of the historic ministry of the Church as represented by the Bishops speaking to us with the authority of their episcopal consecration.

During the past year it has been inevitable that our work should show some material evidence of progress. Our branches number 108, three of them organized this year. Our membership is approximately 3,275. In January, 28 branches made a total increase in their pledges to the Diocesan budget of \$734.00. We ended the fiscal year of 1946 with a surplus of \$1,804.37, due in part to the fact that Diocesan officers did not use the complete amount set aside in the budget for Administration. We have concerned ourselves in our parishes and in our Diocesan organization with the giving of funds for the Church's Program Quota. In our branches we will continue to show a polite but firm interest in the way our vestries allocate parish funds.

There is an increased interest in serious study programs. By study and by action we have shown a thoughtful interest in our Diocesan membership on the N. C. Legislative Council and in the social legislation which the Council sponsored.

There is a tendency on the part of our members to take stock of the organization of their branches, to evaluate it realistically, and to take steps to improve it. There is also a noticeable demand that District and Diocesan organization be efficient and effective. This portends strength for the future. While we are heartened by these signs of progress, we are conscious of the fact that we are far from our potential strength. This fact should serve to keep us from being satisfied with our efforts.

The challenge of the Woman's Auxiliary is always that the life of the woman in the Auxiliary must be constantly from self outward—from self through the Church to God and from self through the Church to the world. We cannot hope to win the woman who developed so much strength during the war years if our branches are content to exist as groups with merely local interest. We must give our members a sense of being necessary to the program of the whole Church. The standards of our branches must be high enough to help us meet the constant demands that we think in world terms. The framework of our organization with all of its departments can provide the means if we but use our imaginations with a will to make our Auxiliary serve God's purposes through His Church. I shall continue to urge you to use such simple devices in your meetings as having every officer at a meeting give some information about the work of the Church relating to her department, in the Diocese and the world outside. This device is based on the faithful reading of books and church periodicals. The information contained in the Diocesan president's monthly letter must reach every member of the Auxiliary. Keeping our members informed in this way about the affairs of the Diocese is one method of developing leadership of the District and the Diocese.

As we view the over all program of the future let us keep in mind certain safeguards. When we pray, "Give us O God Strength to build", let us remember that it is not actually we who build but the Holy Spirit working through us Who gives us a glorious share in the task. As we work to interest our members in the Missionary Program of the Church and to increase the amount of our U.T.O., let us remember that our gifts must proceed from a love of God and thankfulness for His goodness to us—that they must be offered for His blessing before they can reach their full power. Our best intellectual effort must be used to carry out a challenging study program, but we must bear in mind that it is not our own intellectual efforts that brings us an inner light and Peace but the inner light and Peace of the Holy Spirit that enables us to know and understand the Truth. As we concern ourselves with the need and suffering of the world, we must regard ourselves as instruments of the Church, in need of her constant guidance and the grace which her blessed Sacrament of the Holy Communion provides.

Mrs. Cornick moved that the Treasurer's report be accepted. Mrs. P. H. Heydenreich seconded and the motion was carried.

Miss Emma Hall, Inter-racial Chairman, announced that Mrs. J. W. Black, Chairman of the Negro District, would give the report for her department. Mrs. Black gave the report.

Noonday prayers were said by the Rev. Robert L. Crandall, Rector of St. Peter's, Charlotte. Mr. Crandall made an address based on his experience as a chaplain in the Armed services.

The President declared the session recessed for luncheon.

The Meeting convened in the afternoon by singing Hymn 257. Bishop Penick introduced the guest speaker, Dr. Lewis B. Franklin, Treasurer of the National Council. Dr. Franklin's address was based on the observations he made, and the work he did as a member of a Far Eastern Commission of four sent by the Church to the Orient last Fall to make a survey of conditions in the mission field.

Mrs. E. M. McEachern moved that the report of the Credentials Committee be accepted. Mrs. Heydenreich seconded, the motion was carried and the report accepted.

Mrs. Bourne referred to a resolution passed at the 1946 Annual Meeting instructing the president to appoint a committee to clarify the election of delegates and alternates to the Triennial Meeting, and to suggest to the president and nominating committee

ways of making the election of Diocesan officers more democratic. She announced that the following committee had been appointed to act under the resolution: Chairman, Mrs. Roy Homewood, Chapel Hill; Mrs. R. B. Rogers, Raleigh; and Mrs. B. B. Williams, Jr., Warrenton.

Mrs. Homewood presented the committee's report and moved that its recommendations be adopted. Bishop Penick suggested that the phrase "that the Negro District should choose their own delegate" be changed to read "that the Negro District should nominate their own delegate". Miss Nan Clark moved that the report be amended to read "that the Negro District should nominate their own delegate". The motion was seconded, carried, and with this amendment the report was adopted. Under the recommendations of this report it is advised that the District at their Fall Meetings should submit names to the Diocesan nominating committee for the Diocesan offices to be filled at the Annual Meeting; it is advised that the Secretary of Christian Education go as a delegate to Triennial; it is advised that it is not necessary for the U.T.O. Custodian go as a delegate to Triennial, although it is her privilege and honor to go to present the offering; and it is also advised that one member of each newly appointed Nominating Committee be a person who served on this committee the previous year.

The President referred to a proposed amendment to the constitution, a copy of which had been sent to all the branches by the Secretary at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting.

Mrs. Wm. Steele moved that Article IV, Section 2. of the constitution which reads: "These officers with the District Chairmen shall constitute the Executive Board and shall meet at least twice a year at the call of the President" should be changed to read: Article IV., Section 2. "These officers with the District Chairmen, members of the Executive Council and Chairmen of Standing Committees shall constitute the Executive Board and shall meet at least twice a year at the call of the President." Mrs. Marvin McCall seconded and the motion was carried.

The Secretary read Article VIII, Sections 1 and 2 of the constitution concerning the election of officers.

Laurens Wright, Charlotte; and Mrs. F. S. Spruill, Jr. Rocky Mount; Alternates to the Provincial Meeting in Atlanta: Mrs. Irving Carlyle, Winston-Salem; Mrs. E. F. Lucas, Greensboro; Mrs. I. M. Bailey, Raleigh and Mrs. J. M. Hardison, Wadesboro.

The President called for nominations from the floor for each particular Diocesan office to be filled, as well as for delegates and alternates to the Provincial Meeting. In each case, Mrs. Marvin McCall moved that the rules be suspended and the Secretary be instructed to cast the ballot unannouncedly for the name or names submitted by the nominating committee. In each case, the motion was seconded, carried and the names submitted by Mrs. Thomas were elected.

Mrs. H. S. Cobey moved that the President be empowered to appoint delegates to the Provincial Meeting if necessary to fill vacancies. The motion was seconded and carried.

The President asked for a motion for the use of the offering taken at the Evening Service. Mrs. McCall moved that the offering be given to Bishop Chen for his work in China. The motion was seconded and carried.

Mrs. Heydenreich moved that the meeting be recessed until the 8 o'clock evening service. Mrs. M. T. Ruffin seconded, and the motion was carried.

Evening Prayer was read by the Rev. John C. Mott, assisted by Bishop Penick. Bishop Penick introduced the Rt. Rev. Robin T. S. Chen, Asst. Bishop of the Diocese of Anking, China, who preached the sermon. Bishop Chen spoke gratefully of the privilege of working with Miss Laura Clark, missionary from our diocese to his Diocese of Anking.

At 7:30 A.M. April 16 there was a celebration of the Holy Communion with the Rt. Rev. Edwin A. Penick the celebrant, assisted by the Rev. John C. Mott. At this service there was the presentation of the United Thank Offering and a commemoration of the departed by the use of the Auxiliary roll or remembrance.

At 9:45 A.M. the meeting convened in the church by singing Hymn 535 and opening prayers led by the Rev. John C. Mott.

The President introduced, and the meeting was addressed by the following speakers: Mrs. Francis Clarkson, Member of the National Executive Board; Miss Bessie Blacknall, recently retired missionary to Alaska; Mrs. Henry Chapman, wife of the Rev. Henry Chapman of the mission field at Anvik, Alaska; Mr. E. M. McEachern, Business Manager and Director of Vade Mecum; Mrs. M. D. Whisnant, Supervising Matron of the Thompson Orphanage; Dr. Richard Stone, President of St. Mary's School, Raleigh.

Mrs. Bourne reported the amount of the offering at the evening service was \$263.45, and the amount of the U.T.O. presented at the early service was \$12,745.35.

The Treasurer, Mrs. Bouligny, presented the Executive Board's recommendations for the allocation of a \$1,804.67 surplus from 1946, as follows:

Mrs. Spruill seconded and the motion was carried.

Mrs. Bouligny moved that the 1948 Diocesan Budget be raised from \$8000 to \$8500. The motion was seconded and carried.

Mrs. Bouligny presented the 1948 Diocesan Budget approved by the Executive Board totaling \$8500, with \$4250 for Inside the Diocese and \$4250 for Outside the Diocese. She moved that the items for Inside the Diocese be adopted. It was seconded, carried and this portion of the budget was adopted. Mrs. Bouligny moved that the items for Outside the Diocese be adopted. It was seconded, carried and this portion of the budget was adopted.

At the President's request, Dr. Stone introduced Miss Frances Drane, a representative from the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Mary's School. Miss Drane spoke of the work being done by the student auxiliary at that school.

Mrs. E. G. Peoples, Chairman, presented the report of the Committee on Resolutions and moved that each item thereon be adopted. Mrs. L. D. Wall made a motion to amend the Committee's report by deleting the phrase, "Whereas we note with disappointment that there was no action taken by the National Board concerning the third resolution passed by this body last year, therefore". The amended motion was seconded and carried, and with this amendment the Resolutions were adopted.

Mrs. Wm. Steele, Chairman, read the report of the Courtesy Committee and moved that it be accepted. Mrs. Victor Johnson seconded. The motion was carried and the report accepted.

The Secretary read the minutes, and they were approved as read.

Bishop Penick gave his annual message.

Mrs. Wm. Steele, President of the Woman's Auxiliary of Christ Church, Raleigh extended an invitation for the Annual Meeting to meet there in 1948. Miss Lillie Hill moved that the invitation be accepted. It was seconded and the motion was carried.

Bishop Penick installed the newly elected Diocesan Officers who were present.

The President declared the 65th Annual Meeting adjourned.

Bishop Penick pronounced the benediction.

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED AT ANNUAL MEETING 1947

Whereas: we believe that the only hope of the abolition of war lies in the mutual understanding and cooperation among the Nations of the World, and whereas, the United Nations is at present the machinery for affecting such mutual understanding and cooperation, therefore,

Be it resolved: that we, the members of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of North Carolina, in convention assembled, hereby reaffirm our faith in the United Nations as an instrument of lasting peace.

Resolution on Legislation

Whereas: the National Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary has gone on record as favoring the extension of reciprocal trade agreements, and

Whereas: the National Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary favors the admission to the United States of the greater number of displaced and stateless persons than is provided under the present quotas, and

Whereas: the National Executive Board calls upon the women of the Church to exercise their Christian citizenship by learning about these matters, forming their own opinions, and expressing those opinions to their Senators and Representatives in Congress,

Be it resolved: that we request our Diocesan Secretary of Christian Social Relations to include these subjects in our 1947 program of study.

Whereas: the North Carolina Council of Churches is sponsoring a drive for material aid for overseas relief to be conducted April 20-May 11, therefore,

Be it resolved: that we, the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina, in convention assembled, pledge our hearty support, corporately and individually, to this effort to the point of initiating the drive in our own communities where necessary.

Whereas: the Diocesan Officers have repeatedly requested that Branch Officers be elected immediately prior to the Annual Meeting, therefore,

Be it resolved: that this practice be regarded hereafter as mandatory.

Whereas: various members of this assembly have expressed a desire for more democratic election procedure, therefore,

Be it resolved: that in the future the Nominating Committee consider the advisability of presenting at least two names for each office.

Be it resolved: that the Diocesan Executive Board consider the appointment of a Chairman for the devotional part of our programs.

Whereas: we are shocked to hear of the death of a former Diocesan President, Mrs. W. W. Way,

Be it resolved: that a message of affection and sympathy from this body be sent to her family.

It is our aim to have every woman in the Church own and use a Blue Box, whether or not she is an active member of the Woman's Auxiliary. It is potentially an offering from all Churchwomen everywhere.

I am happy to report that the interest in the United Thank Offering is increasing, especially among the younger women of the Church, and I attribute this largely to the splendid work of the District and Branch Custodians. There has been a demand for program materials and an interest in learning what the United

Thank Offering is. These materials are readily available from Miss Beardsley who is always prompt to give any requested information about her department.

I am pleased to say that envelopes for the presentation of the individual offerings are to be had once more and should be obtained by the Branch Custodians in plenty of time to be distributed to every woman who will make an offering.

Money actually on hand for the Spring of 1947 amounts to \$8,047.10, of which \$266.22 was brought from fall as it came too late to be presented at Philadelphia. This is a splendid beginning for the new Triennium and one of which we can be justly, if humbly, proud.

REPORT OF SECRETARY OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

It is impossible to give a complete report of the year's accomplishments of Christian Social Relations as so many of these accomplishments are of an intangible nature. By that I mean that so many little things were done by individuals, groups and even parishes on a spontaneous basis to meet situations as they arose, and no report of those activities was made because they seemed too insignificant to those doing them to even mention, and no credit for them was desired. Yet, they are accomplishments of which Christian Social Relations is justly proud and, when added to the big things, make quite a successful year's work.

We have contributed to the Presiding Bishop's fund for World Relief with money, food and clothing. Some auxiliaries quite successfully conducted city-wide campaigns for relief in Europe. We sent \$206.00 to the Seaman's Church Institute for Christmas kits for Merchant Seamen and sent thirteen filled kits.

Many auxiliaries have clothed one or more children in the Thompson Orphanage. Some have bought medicine for the poor; given Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets to the needy; assisted with Teen-Age Centers and Girl Scout work; sent boxes to County Homes, etc., and have co-operated with the United Council of Churches in its program.

It is my sincere wish that we continue to support the National Council in whatever projects it approves. However, there is much more to Christian Social Relations than fulfilling the projects assigned by the National Council. Every community has some project waiting to be undertaken, and it is the obligation of the local branches to find that project, undertake it and fulfill it without instructions or advice from the National Council or this department. Nevertheless, I am always available for both recommendations and advice.

I wish to give my whole-hearted thanks to all the district and local secretaries for their splendid co-operation. After all, it is they who deserve the credit for the accomplishments throughout the year.

REPORT OF SECRETARY OF SUPPLY

The office of Supply Secretary in the diocese of North Carolina becomes more interesting each day and as the task of Reconstruction and Advance progresses through the world the need for each phase of the work done through the Supply department becomes more imperative.

Supply work is the channel through which auxiliary women provide new and used clothing for missions and schools, house hold and institutional linens and supplies, hospital garments and sick room necessities.

These are either made or purchased by our branches to aid the workers in the mission field and this gives us an opportunity to share more closely in the work of many mission fields.

The women of this diocese need only to be told where there is an opportunity for them to serve, so our first task is to present the needs of our missions to each branch. To accomplish this your diocesan secretary asks the help of every district and branch secretary that we may know and then complete every request and allotment in a truly Christian spirit and in so doing come closer "Unto God's City" and gain by serving "The Strength to Build."

Through your pledges and gifts to the Supply department the following has been accomplished:

1. A contribution of \$110.00 to the Supply Secretaries Gift Fund has been made. This fund is sent in place of personal boxes to missionaries whose salaries are not yet adjusted to new conditions and to retired missionary clergy and lay workers.
2. A check for \$275.00 has been sent to Dr. Lewis B. Franklin for Bishop Binstead and his work in the Philippine Islands. A total of 354 new garments and articles have been purchased and sent for this work. In addition each branch has been asked to contribute used clothing suitable for this mission and many boxes have been reported for this field.
3. St. Mary's School for Indian girls has long been a favorite project in our diocese and this year it has been our joy to send supplies for their dormitories as a part of our national allotment. A total of 456 articles and a case of paper napkins has been shipped to them.

The splendid boxes of used clothing that go to St. Mary's School from North Carolina have been so useful and are always so carefully selected and packed that Miss Charlotte Maxon, the acting head mistress does not hesitate to say that they constitute one of their strongest morale builders.

In addition to the mission fields outside of our diocese there are two other places where we send used clothing. To Miss Lillie Hill in Leaksville for her work and for her to use in her "Thrift Sales." Mrs. Whisnant of the Thompson Orphanage assures us that without the used clothing sent the orphanage she would have a most difficult time keeping "her large family well dressed." She also asks for used household items such as curtains, rugs and shades.

We look forward to a year in which there will be unlimited opportunities for real service. Our task is to let every woman in the diocese know that she may have the privilege of sharing in the work of the Supply Department.

REPORT OF REPRESENTATIVE ON DIOCESAN COUNCIL AND CHAIRMAN OF YOUTH WORK

Since my election in 1946 as your representative on the Diocesan Council, I have attended all four meetings held at the Bishop's residence. At each meeting your president makes a report on auxiliary matters, a report which is always enthusiastically received. That report constitutes the major contribution of the women to the meeting because we feel too inadequate to take a very active part in the discussions of that body. However, the council learns of auxiliary affairs and we, the three women on the council, learn a great deal about the Diocesan and National Church, thus widening our scope of knowledge beyond our local branches. Through the knowledge thus gained, I hope to be able to bring you into closer touch and cooperation with the overall objectives of the whole body of the church.

By virtue of this office, I automatically represent you in the Diocesan department of Youth, and am your chairman of Youth Work in the Auxiliary. These two appointments go hand in hand, and I serve as a liason officer between the two, trying to learn from the Chairman of the Diocesan Department of Youth and his committee in what ways the members of the auxiliary can best assist in the work of his department, and, through my District Chairmen, seeing to it that each and every one of you gets this information. There are still a few branches in the diocese without a secretary of youth work. I urge each District Chairman to rectify this situation as soon as possible!

I have received most gratifying reports from many district chairmen of the renewed interest in the Youth Work in their branches. Space prevents a tabulation of the organizations and the activities involving the youth of all ages. Suffice it to say that I am encouraged at the excellent response my request for reports has brought, and I am hoping that at the end of another year that response will come from all branches through their respective chairmen.

The National Schedule for Youth for 1946-47 called for the continued stressing of the Rule of Life for Individual Young People, the Epiphany Feast of Lights to be conducted by them, the observance of National Youth Sunday, and the annual offering next October. There was also the Corporate Communion for Young People, April 27th, which was widely observed in our diocese. As you all know, the first national youth convention ever held by the Episcopal Church took place in Philadelphia last September, at which our diocese was represented by two counsellors and two young people.

The crying need in the Youth Department is for good and capable counsellors—counsellors who will really learn the job, work at it, and stay with it. This is the most important part you women can take in your branches. And in these days of ever increasing juvenile delinquency, it is more important than ever that you organize the unorganized youth of your church and your community. Let them feel that they are important and have a very special part to play. Give them responsible duties of their own and get them to assist the auxiliary in its undertakings, such as serving suppers, collecting clothes for overseas, wrapping, packing, and mailing them, or in any other jobs which suit their capabilities. See that there is a report on their work made at every auxiliary meeting, in order to keep their presence and needs and activities before you always.

Another very important thing the women of the auxiliary can do is to influence the youth of the church to work in religious fields. So many of our branches are desperate for trained workers for the young people. The money is available but trained workers are not. Urge the college boy and girl of your parish to undertake this as his life's work. Excellent training for this can be begun at an early age in our diocesan camps and conferences. It would be splendid if every branch could be represented by a young person at Delaney and Vade Mecum each summer.

I ask for your increased interest and cooperation, strengthened by your prayers, for this all-important work of our church—The development of your youth program and the bringing of young people to Christianity.

REPORT OF REPRESENTATIVE ON NORTH CAROLINA LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

Your Representative on the N. C. Legislative Council hopes that your study in your parish branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has made you so law conscious that you are a well informed group on how our 5 point program of legislation finally fared in the recent session of the N. C. Legislature. The points of our program that failed in this session will not die, but will be pushed in the session of 1949. It is good to raise teachers salaries but we must see that through law enforcement each child avails himself of the opportunity for better education. This is just one example of the need for this carry over.

Your committee representing you on the Council considers itself more in terms of your ears to keep you informed than your mouth to speak on your behalf, unless you understand clearly beforehand the program of the Council which we are promoting in your name. The program as decided upon and published is not the only legislation we are called on to push. When unexpected legislation is brought to our attention, usually after 8 o'clock at night, or even 10, we are asked to have a committee at the capitol by 9 or 9:30 the next morning. These are surprise bills that have just been introduced. We must decide the question, "Is this social legislation or is it political?" The dividing line at times is hard to determine. Under these circumstances I have found it advisable to

call local women of our Church who might be interested in the bill. If there is any question among these women as to the merits of the bill we drop the matter and do not appear at the capitol.

To illustrate this difference in legislation: When the bill for a two day wait between the issuing of a marriage license and the wedding was about to be introduced, we were active immediately since it is already a provision of a Church canon. But when it came to women sitting on juries, there were as many answers as there were women called! It wasn't the snow that kept us home that day!

The Legislative Council begins work at its meeting this August on a program of legislation which the member organizations will promote during the '49 Legislature. We welcome your suggestions and advice on the social legislation which you consider needed in our State.
