OBJECTIVES OF WOMAN'S AUXILIARY BRANCHES 1948-49

"Give us, O God, the Strength to Build"

"Ye shall receive power after that the Holy Spirit is come upon you, and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth."

WORSHIP: Ye Shall Be Witnesses of the Glory of God.

1. Observe at least four corporate Communion services during the year.
2. Observe Intercessory Days with a corporate Communion or worship service.
January 6, Feast of Epiphany
February 2, Feast of Purification
3. Have a presentation service for the United Thank Offering in Spring and Fall.
4. Observe prayer days referred to in the Calendar of the Dept. of Christian Education.
5. Plan devotions for your meetings so that they are an integral part of the program of the meeting.

STUDY: Ye Shall Be Witnesses of the Truth of God.

1. Plan a program of study for the year in accordance with the recommendations of the Diocesan Secretary of Christian Education.
2. Plan each meeting to have each officer present current information concerning the work of her department in parish, diocese, nation or world.
3. Promote Adult Bible Study Classes.

SERVICE: Ye Shall Be Witnesses of the Love of God.

1. Participate in campaigns for overseas relief.
2. Support the Thompson Orphanage and St. Mary's School for Indian Girls, South Dakota, with gifts and supplies.
3. Support such plans for Christian Social Service as are suggested by the Dept. of Christian Social Relations.
4. Respond to requests from Diocesan Supply Department.
5. Cooperate with local youth organizations.
6. Encourage the acceptance by your vestry of the full Church's program Quota for your congregation.

GIFTS: Ye Shall Be Witnesses of the Merciful Bounty of God.

1. Stress the spiritual significance of the U. T. O. and the presentation at meetings of information concerning its use in the mission field.
2. Contribute funds for furnishings at Camp Delaney, the camp site for Negroes.
3. Endeavor to increase your pledge in December to the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary budget of Jan. 1-Dec. 31, 1949.

FELLOWSHIP: Ye Shall Be Witnesses of the Fellowship of the Family of God.

1. Re-awaken the interest of inactive members.
2. Recruit new members.
3. Sponsor the organization of new branches.
4. Strive for mutual strengthening of Negro and white branches by closer cooperation in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary.
5. Work for greater understanding between races, classes and creeds.

ANALYSIS OF YEAR OF WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF DIOCESE

1. Fiscal year of Diocese and branches runs Jan. 1 to Dec. 31 because it must coincide with National Council fiscal year.
2. Year of active study and action runs from 1st meeting in Fall (Sept.) to last meeting before Summer recess (June). Reason: It must conform to the plans and material sent out from National headquarters, and to the Diocesan Annual Meeting which must be held in the favorable weather of Spring.
3. Summer is preparation period for activities to follow—it is the inactive first part of a new year of study and action.
4. New officers should be elected at a branch meeting prior to Annual Diocesan Meeting. Reasons: (a) New officers are taken into consideration in the election of delegates to the Annual Meeting, (b) New officers' names can be given on report of the year's study and action for publishing in year book.
5. New officers should be installed at last meeting before Summer recess (June meeting). A few branches meet during Summer. Their officers should also be installed at end of June meeting.

6. Officers installed at June meeting spend Summer preparing for coming year of activity. Program of Christian Education should be prepared during this time.
7. New president presides at 1st Fall meeting (Sept.). For branches meeting during Summer she presides at July meeting.
8. Report blanks are sent out to branches in March Diocesan president's letter. Reports cover period from previous July 1st to May 1st (as late in year as possible and yet in time for publishing in year book). Reports are mailed back to District Chairman and Diocesan President in May. List of recently elected officers sent in on report then becomes correct in year book for longest period of year possible.
9. Year book is sent out in August, before if possible.
10. New treasurer is actually installed in middle of fiscal year, along with other officers, but this is much easier for her than taking office in January when she would immediately have to set up new pledges and budget.
11. Annual Diocesan Meeting is the middle of April. This conforms to date of Diocesan Convention of the Church, and to the Bishop's schedule. Year's reports are not available for Diocesan officers for Annual Meeting, but "reports" at this meeting could consist of plans for the future and a general picture of work.

THROUGH CHRISTIAN EDUCATION WE PREPARE TO BE WITNESSES

Branch programs this year have given evidence of growth, by Auxiliary groups and individuals, in study and action that is real and vital.

We will soon be engaged in planning for the 1948-1949 study and action. Our summer conferences will give much inspiration and practical help. Small planning groups and individuals will wish to take stock of objectives, weaknesses and failures in order that we may increase our efforts in worship, study and action during 1948 and '49—the last year of the triennium.

Let us now review just what we have been striving for and what we must continue to strive for. Is it not that through God's guidance we may be participators in the establishing of His Kingdom here on earth?

This is expressed in our Women's Auxiliary theme—Strength to Build—and is in the form of a prayer, "Give us, Oh God, the strength to build the city that has stood too long a dream."

The Church has pointed out to us Christ's answer to that prayer—"Ye shall receive power after that the Holy Spirit is come upon you, and ye shall be witnesses unto me in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth."

If we consider the several phrases of Christ's answer we see that in the first two phrases He gives us assurance that we shall receive the strength to build for which we pray—"after that the Holy Spirit is come upon us." Is this not the imperative reason to study our Christian Faith?

The next phrase, "And ye shall be witnesses unto me," tells us that when the Holy Spirit is come upon us we shall not only have strength but we shall be God's instruments, willing and eager witnesses, believers with knowledge and conviction, testifying in Christian living.

The phrase "In Jerusalem," which was the loved and well-known city of the Jews, may be interpreted that our witnessing unto Christ begins within the Christian Home and Family. Shall we not therefore concern ourselves with this study?

In the phrase, "And in all Judea and in Samaria," we are commanded to witness as brothers in our social and economic relations beyond our limited, familiar home, and town into state, sections, nation, neighbor nations and on out into the world. This is the study of the Christian World.

The phrase, "And unto the uttermost part of the earth," brings to us the imperative to witness by sharing the word of God and Christ's way of life with all men, even unknown and remote peoples. This then is the study of the World Mission of the Christian Church.

And so we know what we are striving for—the strength to build the city of God. We have Christ's assurances and commands for the way we shall obtain that city. Now let us look for a moment on what Woman's Auxiliary offers us as aids and opportunities in Christian growth.

Woman's Auxiliary activities contain five essential elements to aid us in answering our prayer and to provide opportunities for action. These elements are: Worship, Study, Service, Gifts and Fellowship.

The element of worship distinguishes our work from that of civic organizations concerned with creating a better world. Worship is placed first in the order, reminding us that witnessing through service and gifts and fellowship needs as a basis the element of worship—the means through which the Holy Spirit may come upon us.

It is significant that study is placed next to worship in the order. Study means to read, think, question, discuss, learn and come to conclusions and convictions so that we gain real knowledge and understanding which can be translated into true Christian witnessing in service, gifts and fellowship.

A project or action, of course, may begin with any one of these elements but before it reaches its final conclusion the project needs to include the other elements. Let us not consider that action without study will ever be enough nor study without action will be enough. Above all let us remember that study and action must be based on true worship.

May we then each one of us sincerely pray, "Give us, Oh God, the strength to build the city," and open our hearts and minds to the knowledge and love of God, and diligently study, that we may be witnesses unto Christ through true faith in His word, in our homes and in our world and in the mission of the Christian church.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be, "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

ARTICLE II

Object

The object of this organization shall be to help in carrying out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church: Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service.

ARTICLE III

Membership

The membership of this organization shall be composed of all Parish and Mission Branches within the Diocese.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: A President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of Christian Education, a Secretary of Christian Social Relations, a Secretary of Supply, a Custodian of United Thank Offering.

Section 2. These officers with the District Chairmen, members of the Executive Council and Chairmen of Standing Committees shall constitute the Executive Board and shall meet at least twice a year at the call of the President.

ARTICLE V

Duties of Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for. She shall also preside at meetings, and at every Annual Meeting shall address the Auxiliary. She shall make a report to the Diocesan Convention.

Section 2. The Vice-President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have specific duties to be decided in conference with the President.

Section 3. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist the President in preparing and having printed the Annual Report, and at each Annual Meeting shall make a report.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering and Box Work money, and shall make a report of same to the Annual Meeting. At the end of every fiscal year the Treasurer's accounts shall be verified by a public auditor. The Treasurer's report, as audited, shall be published in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Section 5. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Education shall promote and stimulate educational work in the branches of the Diocese by every means in her power, and carry out the program of the National Department of Religious Education.

Section 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Relations shall co-operate with the Christian Social Relations Departments of the Diocese and the National Council, in the promotion of their plans and programs.

Section 7. The Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in the Spring and Fall of each year, and shall remit immediately for investment to the Treasurer of the National Council.

Section 8. The Secretary of Supply shall have charge of the work of the Supply Department.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. All Diocesan officers shall be elected for a term of three years. The Treasurer and the United Thank Offering Custodian to be elected at the first annual meeting after the Triennial; the President, Secretary of Supply, and Secretary of Christian Social Relations to be elected at the second annual meeting after the Triennial; the President to take office at the third annual meeting after the Triennial; Vice-President and Secretary of Christian Education to be elected at the third meeting after the Triennial.

Section 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President.

ARTICLE VII

Districts

Section 1. For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into districts.

Section 2. A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman duly elected by her District for a term of three years. In case of vacancy the Vice-Chairman shall serve as Chairman.

Section 3. Each District shall hold at least one and, if possible, two meetings a year.

ARTICLE VIII

Election of Diocesan Officers

Section 1. Prior to the Annual Meeting, the President shall appoint from the Executive Board a nominating committee of three who shall consider proposed nominees to fill the elective offices at the Meeting, and from the names suggested or considered the Committee shall recommend to the Meeting the nominees for such offices. The consent of the nominees shall be obtained by the Committee before making the recommendation. Nominations may be made from the floor of the Meeting by any delegate provided the consent of the nominee has been first obtained. A majority vote shall be required for all elections. In case there are more than two nominees for the same office and no candidate receives a majority vote, the name receiving the smallest number of votes shall be dropped from the ballot.

Section 2. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund for Calendar Year preceding the meeting.

ARTICLE IX

Finance

The Executive Committee in consultation with the Bishop shall prepare a budget for the year. The budget shall be presented to the branches for their support at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Section 2. From the total amount pledged towards the budget, one-half shall apply to the work of the National Council, one-half to the work of the Diocese.

Section 3. The United Thank Offering and contributions for the Supply Department shall be in addition to the payments on the budget.

ARTICLE X

Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present, provided a written copy of the proposed amendments has been filed with the Diocesan Secretary, and a notice of same mailed to each branch by the Secretary at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting.

BY-LAWS

The place and time of the Annual Meeting shall be approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

1. The order of Business for the Annual Meeting shall be arranged by the President and the Executive Committee.

2. Each Parish Branch having fifty members or less shall be represented by the Branch President and one other delegate (appointed by the President or elected by the Branch). The President, or her representative, and the delegates each has a vote. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the Branch to an additional delegate with power to vote. The Diocesan Officers, District Chairmen, and the Chairmen of Standing Committees shall be empowered to vote on all business and election of officers.

3. Each Branch shall be assessed twenty-five cents per member to provide for Provincial Expenses, printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of Speakers, and other items necessary for the proper administration of this organization. This shall be known as the Central Fund.

4. One fourth of the Branches having the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at the Annual Meeting. Five members shall constitute a quorum at the Executive Committee Meetings.

A. At the Fall District Meetings, all Branches are requested to submit names for consideration by the Diocesan Nominating Committee for officers to be elected at the following Annual Meeting. It is the privilege of the Branches to submit names from any Branch in the Diocese without the consent of the persons named. The Chairman of each District shall send to the Chairman of the Diocesan Nominating Committee all names submitted at her District Meeting.

B. It shall be the privilege of Branches and individual members to submit to the Chairman of the Nominating Committee names for consideration for officers to be elected. These names may be submitted at any time previous to six weeks before the Annual Meeting.

C. The Nominating Committee shall present a ticket of one or more nominees for each office to be filled. The Chairman shall send this ticket to each Branch three weeks prior to the

Annual Meeting. In addition to the ticket presented by this Committee, any nominations indorsed by three Branches and with the consent of the nominees may then be made. Such nominations shall be sent to the Chairman of the Nominating Committee one week prior to the Annual Meeting and the Chairman shall inform the Annual Meeting of any such names. Nominations may be made from the floor of the Annual Meeting by any delegate, provided the consent of the nominees has been obtained.

- D. The incoming President and the incoming Secretary of Christian Education, by virtue of their offices, shall be declared delegates one and two from the Diocese to the Triennial. A nominee from the Negro District, as representing the minority group in the Diocese, shall be elected delegate number three from the Diocese.
- E. The Nominating Committee shall submit a ticket including the names of the incoming President, the incoming Secretary of Christian Education and the nominee from the Negro District, together with three other nominations for delegates and six nominations for alternates to the Triennial. The alternate for delegate number three shall be a member of the Negro District.
- F. Nominations for both delegates and alternates may be made from the floor of the Annual Meeting.
- G. The election of alternates shall follow the announcement of the results of the balloting on delegates.

5. The Diocesan President shall appoint at the beginning of her second year of office the following Chairmen, to serve for three years: Chairman of Church Periodical Club; Interracial Chairman; Legislative Chairman; Missionary Correspondent; Chairman of Young Peoples' Work.

6. The District Officers shall correspond to the Diocesan Officers and shall be elected at the first meeting of the District after the Diocesan Annual Meeting.

The District Chairman shall appoint the following Chairmen, to serve for three years: (1) Church Periodical Club; (2) Prayer Partnership Correspondent; (3) Young Peoples' Work.

7. Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be the authority in all questions of parliamentary law not covered by these By-Laws.

8. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates of any Annual Meeting.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

66th ANNUAL MEETING — WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

Christ Church, Raleigh, April 14, 1948

"Ye Shall Be Witnesses"—This command strikes a most solemn response from Christian hearts today. Simple acquiescence is not witnessing for Christ in any generation, but certainly for us there are such grave questions to be faced in our world and in our personal lives that we know it is a time when Christians must stand and be counted. We are probably more blessed in our material surroundings than any group of women in the world today, and yet even for us it requires courage to speak for Christian principles among people who are amused or antagonistic.

Our Woman's Auxiliary provides wonderful opportunities for witnessing to Christ; it disciplines us in ways of witnessing to Him. If only we will give our best talents, our eager imagination, our first allegiance among organizations to the Auxiliary then we will develop these opportunities beyond anything we have attained so far. Because the life of the Woman's Auxiliary is interwoven with and derived from the life of the Church, because it is dependent upon the life of the Church, we can avail ourselves of a strength and guidance in our work not readily accorded other, secular organizations. As members of the Church, the family of God, we know that only from a worshiping heart can come the eagerness to carry the Good News of the Gospel to others here at home and abroad.

In our program for this meeting we will find constant reminders that the Christians of the Young Churches are witnessing to Christ among us with power and conviction. They are sending to us missionaries who make us realize our limited appreciation of the treasures they value above life.

During this year one new branch of the Auxiliary has been formed, the Francis Joyner branch of All Saints Parish, Roanoke Rapids. In the coming year the formation of new branches should be a special objective of this Diocese. This would be one way of accepting our task as Auxiliary to the Church's program of Evangelism. We must realize that a woman who comes first to Auxiliary meetings may be brought into the Church by means of the Auxiliary. This is the highest fulfillment of our purpose. At this date 53 branches have made a total increase of \$1003.50, in their pledges to the Diocesan budget of 1948. This is cause for rejoicing when we believe that it indicates an increased interest on the part of the members of these branches in the missionary program which the budget supports.

There is no important fault to be found in the plan of organization of the Woman's Auxiliary on the Diocesan level. Our work is as good and as bad as we who do it—and we are the general run of Episcopal sinners! We have put emphasis in the past two years on pruning and clarifying methods of doing our work. It now seems wise in the last year of the triennium for us to emphasize activities that are more obviously spiritual. However, if your branch still needs emphasis on clarifying methods of organization, by all means you should continue your efforts on these lines until efficient organization becomes automatic for you

and may be forgotten in favor of other emphases. In the Diocese during the coming year we should stress the individual reading of the classics of Christian literature and the works of contemporary writers who open our minds to the teachings of Christ through the doctrines of His Church. Plans are taking form to have in each District during the coming year a Quiet Day of Prayer and Meditation conducted by one of our clergy, at a time and place convenient to the members of the Auxiliary in that District.

In the coming year our branches must have faith to launch out on bold ventures believing that God will bless our untiring efforts with sufficient success in the end. In these things we will be laying up for ourselves treasures "Where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt and where thieves do not break through nor steal."

At the noon hour, the Rev. Treadwell Davison, rector of Calvary Parish, Tarboro, conducted a meditation.

The President recognized the following guests: Mrs. Wm. Grimball, President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the IV Province; Miss Grace Chen, daughter of the Rt. Rev. Robin Chen of the Diocese of Anking, China; and Miss Bessie Blacknall, retired missionary of Alaska.

Mrs. T. P. Thomas as chairman of a committee appointed by the President to select a gift from the Woman's Auxiliary for the Rev. Wm. J. Gordon, Bishop-Elect of Alaska, told of the committee's purchase of a Bishop's gold cross to be presented to Bishop Gordon at his consecration next month. Mrs. B. R. Roberts and Miss Emma Hall were the other members of this special committee.

The President declared the session recessed for lunch.

The Meeting convened in the afternoon by singing Hymn 260. Bishop Penick introduced the guest speaker, Dr. Harold Trigg, President of St. Augustine's College, Raleigh. Dr. Trigg spoke of the need for Christian friendship all over the world, pointing out that the fears of man today can be solved in only one way—"if all Christian men would only agree on any one thing that is good."

Mrs. Victor R. Johnson moved that the report of the Credentials Committee be accepted. Mrs. H. H. Hutchinson seconded. The motion was carried and the report accepted.

Mrs. Rufus Jones, Chairman of a committee composed of Mrs. Pickette Williams and Mrs. A. L. James as members, presented an addition to By-Law 2 of the Constitution, and Mrs. Jones moved that the following addition be made to said By-Law 2: "The Diocesan Officers, District Chairmen and the Chairmen of Standing Committees shall be empowered to vote on all business and election of officers." The motion was seconded, carried, and By-Law 2 was declared so amended.

Mrs. Johnston King, Chairman of a Committee appointed to clarify the methods of electing Diocesan Officers and Delegates to the Triennial, read that Committee's recommended amendments under By-Law 4 of the Constitution. The other members of this committee were Mrs. John Perry Hall and Mrs. Jas. McKenzie. Mrs. King pointed out that the amendments to the By-Law as presented were approved by the Executive Board at its meeting the prior evening. Mrs. King explained that the recommended amendments to the Diocesan By-Laws were in accord with a By-Law approved by the Triennial Meeting of 1946 under Representation.

Mrs. King moved that the recommended amendments under By-Law 4 of the Constitution be adopted. Mrs. Fermor Hobbs, Jr., seconded. The motion was carried; the amendments under the By-Law were declared adopted.

The Secretary read Article VIII, Sections 1 and 2 of the Constitution concerning the elections of officers.

Mrs. J. T. Carter, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the following names: President, Mrs. T. P. Thomas; Secretary Christian Social Relations, Mrs. Hugo Walker; Secretary Supply, Mrs. John Labouisse; Delegates to the Provincial Meeting in Augusta, Mrs. John Huddle, Mrs. Rufus Jones, Mrs. E. F. Lucas, Mrs. E. M. McEachern; Alternates to the Provincial Meeting, Mrs. Wm. Steele, Mrs. Jas. McKenzie, Mrs. Jas. Beckwith, Mrs. Julian Robertson. Mrs. Carter pointed out that the President elected will take office one year hence; and that the incumbent President is a delegate to the Provincial Meeting by virtue of her office and that the Vice-President incumbent is the alternate to the President by virtue of her office.

The President called for nominations from the floor for each Diocesan Office to be filled. In each case it was duly moved that the rules be suspended and the Secretary be instructed to cast the ballot unanimsously for the names submitted by the nominating committee. In each case, the motion was duly seconded, carried, and the names submitted by Mrs. Carter were declared elected.

The President called for nominations from the floor for delegates

and alternates to the Provincial Meeting. Mrs. John Smith moved that the rules be suspended and the Secretary be instructed to cast the ballot unanimously for the complete slate of delegates and alternates submitted by the nominating committee. Mrs. Robert Cornick seconded, the motion was carried and the names submitted by Mrs. Carter were declared elected.

The President called for a motion authorizing the President to appoint alternates to the Provincial Meeting if it becomes necessary to do so. Mrs. John Smith moved that the President be so authorized. Mrs. H. H. Hutchinson seconded, and the motion was carried.

Mrs. Roberts, Treasurer, moved that the evening offering be divided equally among the three guest speakers: The Rt. Rev. John Boyd Bentley, Miss Grace Chen and Mr. Guadalupe Saucedo. Mrs. J. T. Carter seconded and the motion was carried.

Mrs. Thomas McMillan moved that the Meeting be recessed until the 8 o'clock evening service. Mrs. Cornick seconded, and the motion was carried.

Evening Prayer was read by the Rev. Ray Holder assisted by Bishop Penick. The Rt. Rev. John Boyd Bentley, D.D., Chairman of the Overseas Department of Missions of the National Council, preached the sermon.

At 7:30 A.M. April 15 there was a celebration of the Holy Communion with Bishop Penick as the celebrant, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Holder. At this service there was the presentation of the United Thank Offering, and a commemoration of the departed by the use of the Auxiliary roll of remembrance.

At 9:45 A.M. the meeting convened in the church with opening prayers led by the Rev. Ray Holder.

The President introduced, and the meeting was addressed by the following speakers: Mrs. M. D. Whisnant, Supervising Matron of the Thompson Orphanage; Mrs. Thomas McMillan and Mr. E. M. McEachern, Directors at Vade Mecum; Mrs. William Grimball, President of the IV Province; Miss Grace Chen of the Diocese of Anking, China; Mr. Guadalupe Saucedo of Mexico, Student at Virginia Theological Seminary.

Mrs. Springs McCoy announced that \$14,981.80 was the total amount of the U.T.O. presented at the early service. This figure was made up as follows: morning offering, \$86.80; Spring ingathering, \$7,447.96; Fall ingathering \$7,447.04.

Mrs. Roberts announced \$168.63 as the amount of the offering at the evening service.

Mrs. Roberts, Treasurer, presented the Executive Board's recommendations for the allocation of a \$2,017.27 surplus from 1947, and she moved that said allocation of the surplus be adopted. It was seconded, carried and the allocation of the surplus was adopted.

Mrs. Roberts moved that the 1949 Budget of the Woman's Auxiliary be increased from \$8,500.00 to \$9,000.00. Mrs. Victor R. Johnson seconded and the motion was carried.

Mrs. Roberts presented the 1949 Diocesan Budget approved by the Executive Board, with \$4,500.00 for items Inside the Diocese and \$4,500.00 for items Outside the Diocese. She moved that the items for Outside the Diocese be adopted. It was seconded, carried and this portion of the budget was adopted. Mrs. Roberts moved that the items for Inside the Diocese be adopted. Mrs. Thomas McMillan seconded; it was carried and this portion of the budget was adopted.

Mrs. Roberts moved that the 1949 Epiphany Offering be sent to Annie Cheshire Tucker for her work in China. It was seconded and the motion was carried. Mrs. Roberts moved that the 1949 Feast of Purification Offering be sent to Laura Clark for her work in China. It was seconded by Mrs. Robt. Cornick, and the motion was carried.

Mrs. Matt Wall, Chairman, presented the report of the Committee on Resolutions, and she moved that each of the five resolutions thereon be adopted.

The first resolution was seconded, carried and adopted.

Mrs. Gaither moved that the second resolution be amended to read "The Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina" instead of "The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina." The motion to adopt the resolution as amended was seconded; the motion was carried, and the resolution as amended was adopted.

The third resolution was seconded, carried and the resolution was adopted.

The fourth resolution was seconded, carried and the resolution was adopted.

The fifth resolution was seconded, carried and the resolution was adopted.

Mrs. Fermor Hobbs, Jr., Chairman, read the report of the Courtesy Committee. Miss Lillie Hill moved, Mrs. E. F. Lucas seconded that the report be accepted. The motion was carried and the report accepted.

Mrs. E. G. Hardeman, President of Christ Church Auxiliary, Charlotte, extended an invitation for the Annual Meeting to meet there in 1949. Mrs. Cornick moved that the invitation be accepted. It was seconded and the motion was carried.

Mrs. E. M. McEachern made a motion to dispense with the reading of the minutes. It was seconded and carried.

Bishop Penick gave his annual message.

Bishop Penick installed the Secretary of Supply and the Secretary of Christian Social Relations, the two new Diocesan Officers to take office immediately.

Miss Lillie Hill moved that the meeting be adjourned. Mrs. C. H. Fluck seconded; the motion was carried and the President declared the 66th Annual Meeting adjourned.

Bishop Penick pronounced the benediction.

**RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED AT THE WOMAN'S
AUXILIARY ANNUAL MEETING
Christ Church, Raleigh, April 14-15**

I. WHEREAS, We believe it right and needful to make definite and sustained effort to deepen the spiritual force of the Woman's Auxiliary; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Diocesan Executive Board sponsor and promote a series of Quiet Days of Prayer and Meditation to be held in each District and to be led by persons qualified by training and experience.

II. WHEREAS, The problem of Displaced Persons is a responsibility of a Christian Citizenry; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina goes on record as supporting legislation in line with the Stratton Bill known as "Emergency Temporary Displaced Persons Admission Act" which calls for the admission of one hundred thousand non quota immigrants per year for the four fiscal years following the passage of the act; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be sent to our Senators and Representatives in Congress.

III. WHEREAS, We believe that it is necessary to strengthen the Charter of the United Nations in order that it may enforce peace; and

WHEREAS, a potent Senate block, including Senator Hoey of North Carolina, is currently submitting the draft of a joint resolution to authorize the President to take immediate steps through this country's United Nations delegation to revise the United Nations Charter by eliminating the Veto right of the five permanent Security Council members in matters of aggression, armaments for aggression, and admission to United Nations membership and thereby opening a way to make possible the establishment of an effective international Police Force; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, That we, The Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina, in convention assembled, go on record as favoring the elimination of the Veto right of the five permanent members of the Security Council; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be sent to our Senators and Representatives in Congress.

IV. WHEREAS, The By-Laws of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina have been amended under Section 4, Article D, and state that a nominee from the Negro District shall be a Delegate to the Triennial; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, That in the future the Nominating Committee consider the advisability of presenting the name of a delegate from the Negro District to the Provincial Meeting.

V. WHEREAS, The Supreme Court of the United States has

rendered a decision in the Champaign, Illinois, case adverse to the teaching of Bible in the Public Schools; and

WHEREAS, The Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina feels that voluntary non-denominational Bible instruction is vital to the moral and spiritual future of America; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, That we do petition the Attorney General of North Carolina to clarify the matter of the ruling of the Supreme Court as to its effect on the Bible Teaching program existent in North Carolina public schools; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be sent to the Attorney General of North Carolina.

REPORT OF UNITED THANK OFFERING CUSTODIAN

The United Thank Offering is not an appeal for Funds. The Offering grows as there is developed in people a sense of thankfulness. The amount given is important to the individual members of the Church only in so far as it is an indication of the spiritual growth of people. We must keep ever before us, not statistics, but the growth in the hearts of women everywhere of a deep sense of thankfulness to Almighty God.

It is a habit of Americans to emphasize the Big—an undertaking is a success if it is Big. We think we have failed if statistics do not show an increase in Bigness and Numbers. The size of the United Thank Offering indicates success only as it indicates that more women are expressing a real sense of thankfulness. In evaluating our year's work we must read our statistics correctly. The United Thank Offering is for all the women of the Church. The Woman's Auxiliary usually comprises the most active women of a Parish. Yet it is evident from the reports sent in to me that even some of the members of the Auxiliary are not contributing to the United Thank Offering. The Offering provides a very definite thing we can do to express our sense of thankfulness so that it can be used in the service of God.

As Diocesan Custodian I wish to express thanks to all who have given loyal assistance. The efficiency of the Ingathering rests upon the interest and promptness in sending in reports, and the organization works smoothly only with the cooperation of the persons in key positions. A deadline has been set for each Ingathering, approximately three weeks after the Ingathering date so that any funds coming in after that date will be applied to the following Ingathering. A printed form is being prepared to facilitate reports by District and Branch Custodians. These will be sent out in plenty of time before each Ingathering.

Our Fall Ingathering amounted to \$7,447.04 and the Spring Ingathering amounted to \$7,445.18, making a total of \$14,892.22. As you can see by the report given in the Year Book for last year we have given more dollars this year—let us pray that this stands for spiritual growth and let us during the coming year in United Thank Offering programs emphasize, as we should, the Spirit of Thankfulness.

REPORT OF SECRETARY OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

This is my third and last report as Secretary of Christian Social Relations of the Diocese of North Carolina. At the outset, I want to say it is a privilege and a pleasure to have served with such a fine group of church women and I will take with me through life the inspiration I have received from my association with them.

During the year, we have given to the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief; sent Christmas kits to the Seamen's Church Institute; we have contributed to the Thompson Orphanage and done many things locally in our various branches. Our number one concern is still World Relief. We must continue to help our hungry and needy friends in Europe if we are to enjoy peace at home.

In my 1947 report, I said that it was my sincere wish that we continue to support the National Council in whatever projects it approved. I want to again state that wish. The National Council is headquarters for all departments of our Church and it should be our duty and pleasure to support the projects which the Council proposes with all of our ability. Co-operation with the National Council during the past year was made somewhat difficult by the action of the Diocesan Council in deciding not to co-operate with and participate in one of the projects of the National Council. In my opinion this was a mistake on the part of the Diocesan Council.

I fear that I have seen a lag in the activities of this department since the end of the war. To me Christian Social Relations is not something to be aroused by patriotic fervor brought about by war conditions. It is the heart and soul of religion itself and should be of a constant nature. It is born in our love for our fellowman and bred in our desire to be of assistance to him.

Money plays a large part in everything in life, including Christian Social Relations, and much credit is due those local branches which have so splendidly met their aims from a financial standpoint; but Christian Social Relations means so much more than the raising of money for some particular project. It means a demonstration of that love for our fellowman in the thousand and one ways it can be demonstrated: a kind word here, a thoughtful gesture there. These mean, frequently, as much to some people as a ton of coal would mean to some others.

And so, to look forward, I would recommend to my successor that much emphasis be placed upon the non-monetary phase of Christian Social Relations; that an effort be made to instill into the Auxiliary that money, while necessary, is only a part of what is necessary, and that thoughtfulness and kindness and consideration for others is every bit as necessary. Our field is large. We can expand our work or we can limit it—we can do much or we can do little, depending entirely on how good a Christian we are.

We hear much of the "New Look" these days. I sincerely hope we may acquire it spiritually; make our lives more meaningful, more tolerant and wear the "New Look" in our hearts. I believe it will be more becoming spiritually than stylishly.

REPORT OF SECRETARY OF SUPPLY

The purpose of the Supply Department of the Woman's Auxiliary is to be a thoroughly organized channel through which every mission station, institution and hospital of our Church may receive the necessary clothing, linens, medical and hospital supplies to enable that station, institution or hospital to do its best work.

Our part in this service has during the past year been more widespread throughout the branches of the diocese than in any previous year of my term of office, and for this I am deeply grateful as it shows an interest and enthusiasm far beyond the actual work. The opportunity to serve special fields will do a great deal toward creating interest in and appreciation of missions after a stimulating study of Evangelism. When carefully planned, Supply work may offer "the last woman in the last pew" her opportunity to share in the task of helping Church General Hospital, Wuchang, China, minister to the sick and homeless in that city. It is impossible for us to work for any mission without our hearts and prayers reaching out to meet the workers with every possible assistance.

Our Supply Work is planned to be carried on throughout the entire year of study and action, and the fields of service are varied, so our special effort has been to keep the opportunities for service presented throughout the year's program, rather than to concentrate on one program.

With your pledges and gifts the diocesan Supply department has made the following contributions to work outside the diocese:

- I. A contribution of \$75 to the Supply Secretaries Gift Fund. This fund makes possible gifts to retired missionary clergymen and their widows and in addition, supplies a yearly gift of a suit of clothing to the layreaders and catechists and interpreters in Alaska and South Dakota, where the task of ministering to the people in their own language necessitates the employment of such helpers. Their stipend is very small and the gift of clothing enables them to be suitably clothed when they lead the services. This fund during the past year also supplied our new missionary doctor at St. Timothys Hospital, Liberia, with household goods.

- II. 366 new articles of linens and clothing has been sent to Buck Mountain Mission in Earlysville, Va.
- III. Our Redeemer Dispensary Center, Pineville, S. C., has received 628 new articles and 10,000 paper napkins.
- IV. Church General Hospital, Wuchang, China, has been sent 504 new garments and articles, most of which have been made by several branches that have undertaken to help with sewing.

In addition to this the amount of work and money spent for postage and express charges that has gone into the sending of used clothing to the above stations and the Philippine Islands is of such proportions I cannot make any attempt to report figures to you, but the letters of appreciation from the Missions and our National Supply Secretary testify to the splendid way you have responded to each and every request.

It has been a very happy privilege to have been your diocesan Supply Secretary for the past three years. I am grateful for your confidence and cooperation and pray that in the future supply work will bring to more Auxiliary women a larger opportunity to share in the "building of the City" whose Maker and Founder is God, that their lives may be enriched by serving, and the missions and work of our Master blessed by receiving their joyful service.

REPORT OF REPRESENTATIVE ON DIOCESAN COUNCIL AND CHAIRMAN OF YOUTH WORK

As my report as your representative on the Bishop's Council, I shall say only that I continue to find the meetings most stimulating, interesting, and informative. It is a rare privilege to attend them four times a year, and I'm sorry all of you cannot be present to hear for yourselves the discussions concerning the Church, both local and national. Mrs. Bourne, Mrs. Landon Hill, and I are the ladies on the council at present, and there are fourteen men, clergy and laymen. I trust you all read the N. C. Churchman and learn from its reports the results obtained and the decisions made at those meetings. Your President makes a report of the work of the Auxiliary, which is always enthusiastically received by the other members of the council. May I add that not the least of the pleasures attendant upon these all-day sessions is the delightful luncheon we enjoy as guests of Bishop and Mrs. Penick at Ravenscroft!

I am happy to say that since my last report as Diocesan Chairman of Youth Work, there have been several appointments of Youth chairmen in the districts. That, of course, means that the work will go more smoothly. The reports sent in to me have been most gratifying, and I'm sorry that lack of time prevents my going into detail about the many different ways our young people are working in and for the Church and for others, both here and abroad. Suffice it to say that a great many branches have young people's organizations; and many others, some quite small numerically, have stirred up interest among the young people without having an actual organization. That, too, is important. Get the Youth of the Church interested and working whether the group is organized or not.

I'm sure you all know of the World Conference of Christian Youth which was held in Oslo, Norway, last summer. There were five delegates from our Church in this country, and four other Episcopalians representing other organizations. The study of this conference is one of the major aims of the 1947-48 program of the United Movement of the Church's Youth. The other majors are the continued stressing of the Rule of Life for individual Young People, the Epiphany Feast of Lights, the Corporate Communion for Young People April 18th (next Sunday—I hope our churches will be *full* of young people), and Youth Sunday and the Annual Offering in October.

Let me urge you to start immediately—if you have not already done so—to foster interest and enthusiasm in our diocesan camps and conferences. It is my earnest hope that every branch will be represented by a young person at Vade Mecum or Camp Delaney this summer. The influence felt there may provide the foundation for a life devoted to religious work, and we are in dire need of trained workers.

Locally, we sorely lack, and must have, adult supervision of and guidance for our youth. That is all-important; and I pray that by next year when I make my final report, I shall be able to say

that every branch in the Diocese has a Chairman of Young People's work. Will you help me make that come true?

REPORT OF MISSIONARY CORRESPONDENT

The time has come to evaluate what has been accomplished during the past year before we enter another year with its new goals and aims.

As Diocesan Missionary Correspondent, I realized that more effective work could be accomplished if there was a duly appointed Missionary Correspondent in every Branch of the Auxiliary. To this end, I have written many letters. The result has been gratifying. Forsyth-Rowan, Miss Sallie Grimes, District Correspondent, was the first 100% District, followed by the Districts of Granville, Guilford, Mecklenburg and Richmond. By the time the Year Book is printed, we hope the four remaining vacancies, namely: Edgecombe 2; Wake 1; Orange 1 will have been filled. The Negro District has increased the number of Correspondents by two.

There has been a decided increase in interest judging by the number of Branches that have requested information on missionaries to be used on programs. These requests have been answered promptly and material sent.

Through letters and cards our missionaries are made to feel that we are in close personal touch with them and are praying for them regularly.

An increase in the amount of the Christmas checks is also a concrete evidence of wider interest.

The District Correspondents have cooperated in a very fine way, getting material out promptly to the Branches. The Contacts which I have made personally and through letters with these splendid women will be cherished by me to the end of time.

REPORT OF REPRESENTATIVE ON NORTH CAROLINA LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

Working in cooperation with Mrs. Huddle, the Diocesan Secretary of Christian Education, we hope each Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary will study in 1948-49 the five-point program of the N. C. State Legislative Council. This will be the program promoted by the Council during the 1949 session of the State Legislature. Your branch Secretary of Christian Education should receive a copy of

the program during the summer. The five points are as follows:

- I. Provide an effective system, with adequate financial support, for the enforcement of the compulsory school attendance law.
- II. Provide minimum wage and maximum hour standards for women and minors.
- III. Provide for state participation in general assistance for persons between 16 and 65 years of age in need of financial assistance.
- IV. Provide, through the School-Health Coordinating Service, for complete physical examinations for all school children at reasonable intervals with a definite plan of referrals for the necessary follow-up treatment.
- V. Provide for strengthening the marriage requirements and safeguarding the divorce laws; and that in divorce proceedings involving children a definite plan for the care and custody of any child under 18 years of age must be presented to the judge hearing the case.

It is interesting to know how the program of the Council is formulated and agreed upon. Over a year ago each of the member organizations of the Council, of which our Diocesan Auxiliary is one, was invited to submit subjects for social legislation, to be considered in formulating a tentative program. Last Fall (1947) the proposals which had been received were submitted to four committees in the general fields of Education, Health, Labor and Welfare. These committees studied the proposals submitted to them and presented reports to a meeting of the Executive Board of the State Legislative Council, held in February, 1948. After extensive study, the Executive Board of the Council recommended the 5 projects which were approved at a meeting February 20, as the tentative legislative program. This program was submitted for approval or disapproval to the member organizations of the Council.

Our Woman's Auxiliary approves the program as a basis of study for our branches. The women in the branches, having this opportunity of informing themselves concerning proposed social legislation, recommended by leaders well equipped to advise us on such matters, can then make their individual decisions on the bills that come before the Legislature. They can write to their representatives in the Legislature and can vote for representatives according to the opinions they form in study, and the records of the men who represent them.

The other member organizations of the State Legislative Council take an active part in lobbying for the bills that carry out the 5-point program, finally agreed upon by the Council. Your representatives from the Woman's Auxiliary do not do this, but they stand ready to help you in any way possible in your study of the program. They are also glad to receive your opinions for their future guidance.

We are asking each branch of the Auxiliary this year to be ever mindful of personnel vocational Church work, and to pray diligently that these fields of service now open may be supplied with efficiency and consecration.

Any women interested in professional church work are asked to get in touch with the chairman and receive through her the material from National Personnel Department.

REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

The Church Periodical Club represents a unique, essentially vital but much neglected section of missionary endeavor. Let us think of it in terms of a crusade against spiritual illiteracy. Particularly at this time there is need for the contributions which the C.P.C. work can make to the missionary program of the Church.

During the recent war whole libraries of schools and seminaries in the mission field were destroyed. Funds have been raised for the restoration of seminary libraries in Japan and the Philippines, but the financial goals have by no means been reached. A gift from the budget of your branch or from individual members will help in this important task.

Our own periodicals that we consider of real value may be sent on as quickly as we have read them to some person in the mission field. Our missionaries in lonely fields of service need the spiritual stimulation of reading the same things that we at home read for strength and growth. Christian books of study, devotion, biography and entertainment, and subscriptions to periodicals, secular and religious—these can be sent to a mission worker, a priest or a Bishop in the mission field as evidence of our continuous concern for them and the work they are doing. Gifts of books and periodicals printed in Braille may be made by your branch or by indi-

viduals. A memorial book sent to a mission field, instead of flowers sent to a funeral, is most fitting.

The National Office is always glad to send you the names of those to whom these gifts may be sent. They will also send you a Manual, price 25c, and a pamphlet, "Share With Them," which will be guides for doing the work in your Auxiliary in the future. The address is:

All gifts of money should be sent to the Woman's Auxiliary Diocesan Treasurer, marked "Special—Church Periodical Club."

The responsibility for seeing that C. P. C. work is done by the Auxiliary branch as a whole should be assigned to some one member. If your branch cannot have a C.P.C. Secretary, then some other officer who is interested and whose other duties are related to this work should be given the responsibility. She can then report to the branch on the places and people who need and receive your gifts. The whole plan then becomes a part of our Christian Education on the mission of the Church to the World.

We must pray for increased interest and cooperation in this work during 1948-49 when we celebrate the 60th anniversary of the beginning of the Church Periodical Club.

REPORT OF FIELD WORKER IN THE NEGRO DISTRICT

As early as June 10, 1947, through the intense interest and kindness of our Interracial Chairman, Miss Emma J. Hall, plans began to take shape for a field worker in our district. On July 11th in conference with our Diocesan President, Mrs. Bourne, and Miss Hall, the order was kindly given, "Go Forward," and from then we went, praying God's Holy Spirit to guide us every step of the way.

In early September I had a conference with top executives at "281," New York City, and received much help, literature and encouragement.

September 12th visitations began. We have 19 churches, 2 of which are parishes—all having had some semblance of an Auxiliary branch. Fifteen of the nineteen have been visited thus far with 10 to 20-odd women present in most places. I attended church services and church schools, in most places speaking, by request.

I attended two meetings of the Department of Christian Education at St. Mary's Student Center, Greensboro, and two Youth Conferences at St. Mark's, Wilson, and St. Philip's, Salisbury. The District meeting in the Fall was well attended and we had a very good program under the direction of our efficient Chairman, Mrs. J. W. Black.

Material was sent each branch for World Day of Prayer. One woman used 100 or more leaflets and posters. I shared in a city-

wide service and program with approximately 100 persons present.

During the severe weather I sent out approximately 200 letters, many cards and made 66 visits to the sick and shut-ins in Durham.

Our Goals:

1. Organize branches on Diocesan and World-Wide plans—have had to reorganize most branches.
2. Become Auxiliary conscious—to feel the Spirit of the organization, that of spreading God's Kingdom in the lives and hearts of all people.
3. Recognize the value of using and studying our Year Book as the wonderful guide it is.
4. Emphasize the acceptance of the challenge given in Mrs. Huddle's excellent article, "Christian Education for Each Auxiliary Woman."
5. Peruse the 5 Objectives of the Woman's Auxiliary.
6. Have well planned programs for the year—some branches have done well on this point.
7. Live up to our obligations, financial, moral and spiritual.

Our Plans:

To put forth every possible means to continue to push our work in advancing in Christian Education.

To improve, personally, in understanding of each phase of the work through study, work and prayer, and to pass it on to others.

Being especially interested in the Future Church—Our Youth—we cannot too strongly emphasize our hopes and plans for greater work among them and for building up our Church Schools.

With 19 churches and only seven or eight ministers we can readily see how very poorly we are manned and greatly handicapped for leadership, and in some places very poor buildings and little equipment. The few ministers attempt to carry on two or three churches each—an almost impossible job. They are over-worked or, in instances, not working enough so that results are far below par. Many fine, strong outsiders love our services. Others are hungry for the light, and we must "Go into all the world." People are there wanting to come in—they are willing and anxious to work. The lack of strong leadership is our greatest handicap and crying need! We need our Bishop's help to adjust some important matters. We must plan and recruit for really progressive, consecrated Leadership!

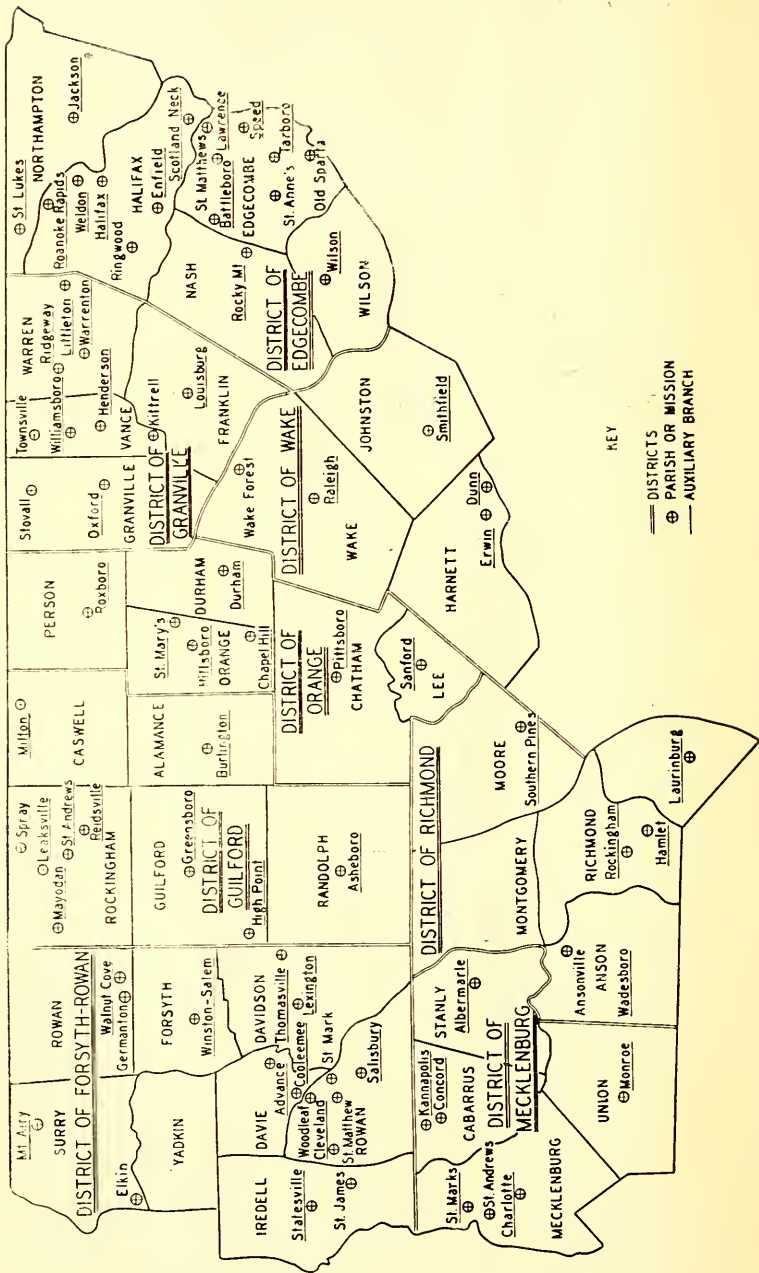

OBJECTIVES OF WOMAN'S AUXILIARY BRANCHES 1949-50

"God is faithful, by whom ye were called unto the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord."—I Cor. 1:9.

WORSHIP: Ye are called to meet God in His Holy Temple.

1. Observe at least four corporate Communion services during the year.
2. Observe Intercessory Days with a corporate Communion or worship service.
 - January 6, Feast of the Epiphany.
 - February 2, Feast of the Purification.
3. Have a presentation service for the United Thank Offering in Spring and Fall.
4. Attend the Quiet Day of Prayer and Meditation in your District, December 2, the first Friday in Advent.
5. Observe prayer days sponsored by United Council of Church Women, listed in Diocesan Calendar.
6. Plan devotions for your meetings so that they are an integral part of the program of the meeting.

STUDY: Ye are called unto the fellowship of truth-seekers.

1. Plan a program of study for the year in accordance with the recommendations of the Diocesan Secretary of Christian Education.
2. Plan each meeting to have each officer present current information concerning the work of her department in parish, diocese, nation or world.
3. Promote adult Bible Class study.

SERVICE: Ye are called to be servants and friends of Jesus Christ.

1. Participate in campaigns for overseas relief.
2. Support the Thompson Orphanage and St. Mary's School for Indian Girls in South Dakota, with gifts and supplies.
3. Support such plans for Christian Social Service as are suggested by the Dept. of Christian Social Relations.
4. Respond to requests from Diocesan Supply Department.
5. Cooperate with local youth organizations.
6. Encourage the acceptance by your vestry of the full Church's Program Quota for your congregation.

GIFTS: Ye are called to be good stewards.

1. Stress the spiritual significance of the U. T. O. and the presentation at meetings of information concerning its use in the mission field.
2. Contribute funds for furnishings at Camp Delany, the camp site for Negroes.
3. Endeavor to increase your pledge in December to the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary budget of Jan. 1-Dec. 31, 1950.

FELLOWSHIP: Ye are called unto companionship with Christ through the Church.

1. Re-awaken the interest of inactive members.
2. Recruit new members.
3. Sponsor the organization of new branches.
4. Strive for mutual strengthening of Negro and white branches by closer cooperation in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary.
5. Work for greater understanding between races, classes and creeds.

ANALYSIS OF YEAR OF WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF DIOCESE

1. Fiscal year of Diocese and branches runs Jan. 1 to Dec. 31 because it must coincide with National Council fiscal year.
2. Year of active study and action runs from 1st meeting in Fall (Sept.) to last meeting before Summer recess (June). Reason: It must conform to the plans and material sent out from National headquarters, and to the Diocesan Annual Meeting which must be held in the favorable weather of Spring.
3. Summer is preparation period for activities to follow—it is the inactive first part of a new year of study and action.
4. New officers should be elected at a branch meeting prior to Annual Diocesan Meeting. Reasons: (a) New officers are taken into consideration in the election of delegates to the Annual Meeting, (b) New officers' names can be given on report of the year's study and action for publishing in year book.
5. New officers should be installed at last meeting before Summer recess (June meeting). A few branches meet during Summer. Their officers should also be installed at end of June meeting.

6. Officers installed at June meeting spend Summer preparing for coming year of activity. Program of Christian Education should be prepared during this time.
7. New president presides at 1st Fall meeting (Sept.). For branches meeting during Summer she presides at July meeting.
8. Report blanks are sent out to branches in March Diocesan president's letter. Reports cover period from previous July 1st to May 1st (as late in year as possible and yet in time for publishing in year book). Reports are mailed back to District Chairman and Diocesan President in May. List of recently elected officers sent in on report then becomes correct in year book for longest period of year possible.
9. Year book is sent out in August, before if possible.
10. New treasurer is actually installed in middle of fiscal year, along with other officers, but this is much easier for her than taking office in January when she would immediately have to set up new pledges and budget.
11. Annual Diocesan Meeting is the middle of April. This conforms to date of Diocesan Convention of the Church, and to the Bishop's schedule. Year's reports are not available for Diocesan officers for Annual Meeting, but "reports" at this meeting could consist of plans for the future and a general picture of work.

WE PREPARE FOR THE NEXT THREE YEARS

We are now ending the 1946-49 Triennium with its humbling cry and great theme "Give us, Oh God, the strength to build the city."

From the programs of the several branches this year, we may conclude that there is a growing recognition of the need to understand and truly believe our Christian Faith and there is an urgency to practice that faith in building more Christian homes and an increasingly Christian world.

And now we look forward to a new Triennium of 1949-1952. With it will come a new theme. Will this theme direct us to talk about, study and do something quite different from this triennium? Of course not, for the task is surely not finished, the city is still a dream. If we have made a small beginning in our building we must go on and we must continue to pray for the strength to do so. We will note, therefore, that only the wording of themes will be different. Our task will be the same. The theme for Triennial Meeting this September and October in San Francisco will be, "Called Unto His Holy Fellowship."

This theme is an answer and a command. An answer to our cry of the past three years, Give us strength, a command to follow Christ if we expect to participate in building a Christian world. If we have been sincere in recognizing the need for a truly Christian world and have been groping toward its building and have learned that the strength to build comes from God then we are ready to receive this answer and command.

We who bear Christ's name are reminded that we are called, that is we are specially chosen for a purpose and it is our privilege and duty to answer and come unto His Holy fellowship, that is to learn to be close companions, knowing Him, loving Him, and following Him. If we answer the call and accept the privilege of His

leadership we will surely receive strength to build a good world, and through His Holy Fellowship we will be able to witness to Him in our homes, in our world and we will carry the news of His Holy Fellowship unto all nations.

This theme is taken from I Corinthians, 1, 9. We would all find it helpful to read again this Epistle, by way of putting our minds in tune to begin our preparation for the new triennium. We will see how appropriate it is to our times. We will note that Paul teaches us the primary necessity for Christians to think clearly concerning the confusions and conflicts of our times, facing these with a true understanding and a belief that the Christian revelation is the only answer to the problems we have to solve.

Paul points out that leaders and heroes always have followers in political, economic and social realms. Even the church is split into factions following various leaders. But Paul tells us that we must turn and listen to the call of Christ, the one true leader. All other leaders must be evaluated as servants to Him. If we are to build a Christian world we will have to come unto His Holy Fellowship.

During the summer and after General Convention and Triennial Meeting we will be notified of numerous tracts, pamphlets and books to use for our study and program planning. However we do not need to wait. Let us go on from where we are. We can fit in the new as it comes to us. The National Council Department of Christian Education is planning Parish study programs for 1949-1950. Two of these units will be on the Christian Family. The interdenominational Mission Studies for 1949-1950 are on 1. *Japan*, and 2. *Cooperation for a Christian Nation*. Let us keep informed by reading our church papers.

Let us remember that each woman has the responsibility of listening to and answering the call unto His Holy Fellowship. Woman's Auxiliary group programs and study classes should aid us but are not sufficient unto themselves. Personal and family prayer and Bible reading, personal study, thought and action will be the way the Christian world will come into reality.

The privilege of serving as Diocesan Secretary of Education ends for me at this meeting. These three years I shall always cherish. I have had the support and cooperation of all of you. Your vision of the need for Christian Education and interest in individual and group programs has been an inspiration.

I can assure our next secretary of education that she will find in this Diocese women who are ready to accept programs of study that will lead them to be better able to answer the Call Unto His Holy Fellowship.

4. Send out U.T.O. envelopes with notice of the service.
5. Check parish records often to be sure you have all church women on your list.
6. Appoint a committee that really works with you.
7. Have two Presentations a year.
8. Keep the U.T.O. always before the women by giving a report or missionary news item at every business meeting.
9. Have at least one program a year on the U.T.O.
10. Send for U.T.O. printed materials at Church Missions House, 281 4th Avenue, New York, N. Y.
11. Observe the time limit given you by the Diocesan custodian so your offering will not have to be carried over to the next Ingathering.
12. Send all reports or contributions to the custodian of your District.
13. Ask your rector to have a corporate celebration of the Holy Communion September 29, 1949, the day of the presentation of the United Thank Offering at the Triennial Meeting in San Francisco.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

The Bible and the Church through the ages have proclaimed certain truths as a guide in man's relation to his fellowman. Our Church teaches us that when He was here upon earth, our Lord Jesus Christ, once and for all, gave certain fundamentals of faith which we must accept and practice if we are to be truly Christian. In the perfect prayer, our Lord prayed "Our Father." In using the word "our" he associated himself with all mankind, with the needy everywhere, of every race, color, and tongue.

Through Christian Social Relations we try to put into practice the brotherhood of man because we believe in the Fatherhood of God. A program of Christian Social Relations must be such that it will help individuals to seek and to find, and to express their Christianity through relationships with other individuals.

Any program of Christian Social relations must contain the three following divisions:

I. Worship.

1. Frequent use of prayers for peace, for missions, for Christian service and social justice.
2. Observance of special occasions such as Race Relations Sunday, Labor Sunday and World Order Sunday.
3. Corporate communions of individuals interested in social relations work.
4. Special emphasis on Christian Social Relations in devotional periods of the auxiliary.
5. Prayers for use in family worship.

II. Study.

An adequate study of social problems is imperative as a basis for our worship and action. An early conference with the secretary of Christian Education should be a means of incorporating social subjects into the educational program.

The following topics are suggested:

1. Christian Marriage.
2. Christian Home and Family.
3. Displaced Persons.
4. Race Relations.
5. Labor and Employment.
6. Social Legislation.
7. The United Nations.
8. World Order.

The following Christian Social Relations packets may be obtained from the book store at 281 Fourth Ave., New York 10.

1. The Christian and Citizenship.
2. The Christian and the Community.
3. The Church and economic life.
4. The Church and Race Relations.
5. The Church and International Relations.
6. Social Relations in the Parish.

III. Action.

Action in any work undertaken as an individual or as a group to render Christian Service and to promote a better world for all people. It is very important that any social action is preceded by worship and study. Any branch may follow as many of the following suggestions as seem practical for the group.

1. Support the programs of the agencies and institutions of the Church and the community which offer health and welfare services through gifts and volunteer service.
2. Fulfil one's obligation as a citizen by careful voting, and by registering Christian opinion upon social legislation.
3. Strive for better cooperation between the Negro and white branches of the auxiliary.
4. Support the Southern Regional Council.
5. Make a determined effort toward resettlement of Displaced Persons in the community.
6. Send CARE packages. (50 Broad St., New York City 4.)
7. Send much good used clothing to Church World Service. (New Windsor, Md.)
8. Support Thompson Orphanage, St. Agnes Hospital and other schools and hospitals within the Diocese.
9. Support overseas missions.

YOUTH WORK

1. Place yourself on Youth Mailing List by sending \$1.00 to Division of Youth, 281 Fourth Avenue, New York.
2. Subscribe to "Churchways," also from 281 Fourth Avenue, New York, for 25 cents a year. It contains a wealth of condensed information.

3. Read the North Carolina Churchman, particularly the pages devoted to Youth activities. You may get ideas there which will be helpful in your own work with the young people.
4. Make the young people feel that they have an important part to play in the life of the parish by giving them specific duties, some in cooperation with adults, and others for which they are solely responsible. For instance, let them
 - (a) help with suppers at the parish house
 - (b) help with every member canvass
 - (c) collect clothing and food for any of the needy
 - (d) collect, wrap, and mail articles for overseas relief
 There are many more you will think of.
5. See that they participate in the Majors of the year—Youth Sunday with its annual offering, Epiphany Feast of Lights, Nationwide Corporate Communion, and the World Relief Program with its motto "Do it Day by Day."
6. Reiterate the theme of the Youth Department—"To Know the Christ and to Make Him Known."
7. Report at every meeting of the Auxiliary something of interest concerning the work among the young people of the parish.
8. Foster interest in the youth conferences in the diocese, and see that your branch is represented by at least one young person at Vade Mecum or Camp Delaney.
9. Enlist the aid of the members of the Auxiliary in all the departments of youth work, from the Guild of the Christ Child, the Church School, Junior Choirs, Junior Altar Guilds, Acolytes Guild, etc., through the Young Peoples' Service Leagues. Help with the Scout Troops, or any other organizations sponsored by the parish. There are innumerable ways in which the women can be of invaluable aid and there are places which can be filled by our women only. Make them feel how necessary they are and what a grave responsibility and rare privilege is theirs in this all-important work of our church, namely, the developing of our Youth program and the bringing of our young people to Christianity.

SUPPLY

The supply work of the Woman's Auxiliary is to provide certain material needs of our various missions and institutions, both at home and abroad. The needs come under the headings of clothing, household and institutional furnishings, surgical supplies and occasionally vestments and altar linens and other things of a material nature, for which the requesting mission has not sufficient funds.

Assignments are made to each diocese by the National Supply Department which has evaluated the needs and requests of the missionaries in charge. It is the responsibility, and privilege, of the women of the church to see that these needs are met. As members of the Auxiliary, we are given this satisfying and concrete way of carrying out Christ's bidding, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel."

We were not given any assignment for Diocesan Missions in the period covered by this report but we were assigned two mis-

sions in Puerto Rico: St. Hilda's and St. Joseph's. To these missions, we have sent clothing for both adults and children, infants' layettes, household supplies and surgical materials. The latter are used in the dispensary operated for the peoples of the missions and the vicinity. Some of this clothing was made by branches in the diocese, who had volunteered to sew. The rest was purchased through the money contributed by your branches to the Supply Fund. Splendid boxes of used clothing were also shipped to them.

A letter has come from the Rev. E. Reus-Garcia, the Missionary in charge of these missions, expressing his gratitude and that of his people for what they have received, and making another request, which I now pass on to you. I ask for your help, and I quote from his letter, "If you know of any used and in good condition altar linen, purificators and choir surplices, we will greatly appreciate your helping us. We are in great need of these things which we cannot afford buying." If, in the branches, there are any of these items available, please send them to me and I shall gladly ship them to him.

Besides the work done in Puerto Rico, \$75.00 was sent to the Supply Secretary's Gift Fund. This fund replaces the former gifts of personal clothing sent to missionaries and their families, widows of missionaries and to lay workers, such as interpreter and catechists in Alaska and South Dakota, who serve the church on a part-time basis. These gifts are now made by check, shortly before Christmas, and are accompanied by a letter explaining that they are made possible by the interest of the women of the Church.

To come closer home, the Thompson Orphanage was given \$56.65 with which to buy bedspreads. Branches throughout the Diocese have also sent them boxes of clothing. The need for this is always great, for without your help in this way, the girls and boys there could not possibly look the way they do: a credit to Mr. and Mrs. Whisnant, the Episcopal Church and above all, to themselves!

Although St. Marys School for Indian Girls in South Dakota was not assigned to our Diocese this year, they made a direct appeal to us. Through the generosity of a friend, we were able to answer this appeal, and sent them 100 yards of splendid material which was used to meet an urgent need for curtains and other things.

The branches who have done sewing for the Supply Department have made a great contribution to the work of the Auxiliary. There are others, who also volunteered to sew, who were not called on. That was because we expected to ask you to sew for missions in this Diocese, but that assignment did not come to us. However, we are confident that we shall be asked to work for our own Diocesan institutions and Missions this next year, and we are counting on you then.

It is not possible to tell you now to what missions we shall be asked to send supplies as that information does not come to us until early Fall. I shall get that assignment to you at the earliest possible date, and I look forward to working with you all and sharing with you the joy of doing God's work by helping our less fortunate fellow men.

1949-1950 is a new year of study and action in the Woman's Auxiliary and one of new opportunities for each one of us. Let us make the most of them and ask ourselves wherein we can strengthen and improve the work of our department.

1. Do we make a real effort to integrate it with that of the Educational Department?
2. Do we avail ourselves of the help that department can give us to inform ourselves and Auxiliary members about the missions and countries to which we are sending supplies?
3. Is each woman in each branch given an opportunity of knowing and understanding the needs of the institutions and missions of this Diocese, as well as of those overseas?
4. When, of necessity, changes have to be made in personnel of officers during the year, do we promptly notify our District Officers and in turn the Diocesan Officers, so as to save valuable time in getting material and information to the correct person and thereby eliminate the necessity for repeating the procedure?
5. Do we have a clear understanding of the distinction between the work of the Department of Christian Social Relations and that of the Supply Department?
6. Do we realize that the Thompson Orphanage depends greatly on our boxes of good "out-grown" and not "out-worn" clothing and that their need for coats, woolen articles, etc., is a pressing one?
7. Are we prompt in furnishing assignments and particular about sending in report forms?
8. Finally, do we make an honest effort to see that "the last woman in the last pew" is informed about the Supply Department and given an opportunity to share in its work?

PERSONNEL

For many years the women of the church have been saying prayers and making offerings of money to the United Thank Offering; and for many years women have been offering their lives to the service of the church. It has been only comparatively recent that we have been stressing the latter contribution; that is, stressing it through the various dioceses by appointing a personnel representative on the Executive Board of the Diocese. North Carolina appointed its first personnel representative less than five years ago. Within that time much stimulation has been given and growth shown in this branch of the church's program. However, at the present time there is dire need for professional workers at home and abroad.

The fields of service are wide and varied. They are Missionary Directors of Religious Education, College Workers, Teachers, Preachers, Rural Workers, Doctors, Nurses, Secretaries, and Directors of Education in Parish, and other Specialists. Professional church training is given at the following schools: Windom House, New York, St. Margaret's House, Berkeley, California, Divinity School in Philadelphia, and Bishop Payne Divinity School, Petersburg, Virginia.

All of us must develop a consciousness of the needs of the church for trained professional workers, and we should keep watchful eyes on gifted young people in our communities who are potential recruits. We should be alert to present to them in personal conversation the opportunities for service to the Master in vocations in the church.

The needs are constantly listed in church papers. "Church Ways" carries a monthly list of vacancies in the mission fields which should be given publicity in our auxiliary meetings and in meetings of our young people's organizations. The schools for special training, and the available help of *scholarships* should be made known.

To develop interest in, and knowledge of personnel work in the dioceses, the following suggestions are offered to the Woman's Auxiliary, to the young people, and to the college workers:

- 1) Woman's Auxiliary
 - a. Have a program on: "Vocations in the Church for Women."
 - b. Have a professional worker in this diocese speak on her work.
 - c. Present to the parish, or to the young people, or to the men of the church a play, a movie, or a speaker on "Professional Vocations in the Church."
 - d. Panel—Clergyman, Director of Religious Education, Teacher and Youth Worker.
 - e. Request the rector of the parish to preach on "The Vocation of Laymen and Women."
- 2) Young People
 - a. Have a play on "Vocations in the Church," or on "A Mission Field of the Church."
 - b. Panel on: "Vocations in the Church."
 - c. Debate: "Are Church Workers Necessary?"
- 3) College Worker
 - a. See that "Vocations" and "The Fields of Service" are presented.
 - b. Entertain the college students in your home, by invitation on a Sunday when a Missionary preacher is in the pulpit.
 - c. Send at least one student to Vocational Conference.
 - d. Courses in Religion should be required in Church Schools and Colleges.

With the will of God, and your help this part of the church's program will go forward.

CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

The Church Periodical Club represents a unique, essentially vital but much neglected section of missionary endeavor. Let us think of it in terms of a crusade against spiritual illiteracy. Particularly at this time there is need for the contributions which the C.P.C. work can make to the missionary program of the Church.

During the recent war whole libraries of schools and seminaries in the mission field were destroyed. Funds have been raised for

the restoration of seminary libraries in Japan and the Philippines, but the financial goals have by no means been reached. A gift from the budget of your branch or from individual members will help in this important task.

Our own periodicals that we consider of real value may be sent on as quickly as we have read them to some person in the mission field. Our missionaries in lonely fields of service need the spiritual stimulation of reading the same things that we at home read for strength and growth. Christian books of study, devotion, biography and entertainment, and subscriptions to periodicals, secular and religious—these can be sent to a mission worker, a priest or a Bishop in the mission field as evidence of our continuous concern for them and the work they are doing. Gifts of books and periodicals printed in Braille may be made by your branch or by individuals. A memorial book sent to a mission field, instead of flowers sent to a funeral, is most fitting.

The National Office is always glad to send you the names of those to whom these gifts may be sent. They will also send you a Manual, price 25c, and a pamphlet, "Share With Them," which will be guides for doing the work in your Auxiliary in the future. The address is:

All gifts of money should be sent to the Woman's Auxiliary Diocesan Treasurer, marked "Special—Church Periodical Club."

The responsibility for seeing that C.P.C. work is done by the Auxiliary branch as a whole should be assigned to some one member. If your branch cannot have a C.P.C. Secretary, then some other officer who is interested and whose other duties are related to this work should be given the responsibility. She can then report to the branch on the places and people who need and receive your gifts. The whole plan then becomes a part of our Christian Education on the mission of the Church to the World.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be, "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

ARTICLE II

Object

The object of this organization shall be to help in carrying out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church: Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service.

ARTICLE III

Membership

The membership of this organization shall be composed of all Parish and Mission Branches within the Diocese.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: A President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of Christian Education, a Secretary of Christian Social Relations, a Secretary of Supply, a Custodian of United Thank Offering.

Section 2. These officers with the District Chairmen, members of the Executive Council and Chairmen of Standing Committees shall constitute the Executive Board and shall meet at least twice a year at the call of the President.

ARTICLE V

Duties of Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for. She shall also preside at meetings, and at every Annual Meeting shall address the Auxiliary. She shall make a report to the Diocesan Convention.

Section 2. The Vice-President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have specific duties to be decided in conference with the President.

Section 3. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist the President in preparing and having printed the Annual Report, and at each Annual Meeting shall make a report.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering and Box Work money, and shall make a report of same to the Annual Meeting. At the end of every fiscal year the Treasurer's accounts shall be verified by a public auditor. The Treasurer's report, as audited, shall be published in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Section 5. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Education shall promote and stimulate educational work in the branches of the Diocese by every means in her power, and carry out the program of the National Department of Religious Education.

Section 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Relations shall co-operate with the Christian Social Relations Departments of the Diocese and the National Council, in the promotion of their plans and programs.

Section 7. The Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in the Spring and Fall of each year, and shall remit immediately for investment to the Treasurer of the National Council.

Section 8. The Secretary of Supply shall have charge of the work of the Supply Department.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. All Diocesan officers shall be elected for a term of three years. The Treasurer and the United Thank Offering Custodian to be elected at the first annual meeting after the Triennial; the President, Secretary of Supply, and Secretary of Christian Social Relations to be elected at the second annual meeting after the Triennial; the President to take office at the third annual meeting after the Triennial; Vice-President and Secretary of Christian Education to be elected at the third meeting after the Triennial.

Section 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President.

ARTICLE VII

Districts

Section 1. For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into districts.

Section 2. A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman duly elected by her District for a term of three years. In case of vacancy the Vice-Chairman shall serve as Chairman.

Section 3. Each District shall hold at least one and, if possible, two meetings a year.

ARTICLE VIII

Election of Diocesan Officers

Section 1. Prior to the Annual Meeting, the President shall appoint from the Executive Board a nominating committee of three who shall consider proposed nominees to fill the elective offices at the Meeting, and from the names suggested or considered the Committee shall recommend to the Meeting the nominees for such offices. The consent of the nominees shall be obtained by the Committee before making the recommendation. Nominations may be made from the floor of the Meeting by any delegate provided the consent of the nominee has been first obtained. A majority vote shall be required for all elections. In case there are more than two nominees for the same office and no candidate receives a majority vote, the name receiving the smallest number of votes shall be dropped from the ballot.

Section 2. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund for Calendar Year preceding the meeting.

ARTICLE IX

Finance

The Executive Committee in consultation with the Bishop shall prepare a budget for the year. The budget shall be presented to the branches for their support at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Section 2. From the total amount pledged towards the budget, one-half shall apply to the work of the National Council, one-half to the work of the Diocese.

Section 3. The United Thank Offering and contributions for the Supply Department shall be in addition to the payments on the budget.

ARTICLE X

Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present, provided a written copy of the proposed amendments has been filed with the Diocesan Secretary, and a notice of same mailed to each branch by the Secretary at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting.

BY-LAWS

The place and time of the Annual Meeting shall be approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

1. The order of Business for the Annual Meeting shall be arranged by the President and the Executive Committee.

2. Each Parish Branch having fifty members or less shall be represented by the Branch President and one other delegate (appointed by the President or elected by the Branch). The President, or her representative, and the delegates each has a vote. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the Branch to an additional delegate with power to vote. The Diocesan Officers, District Chairmen, and the Chairmen of Standing Committees shall be empowered to vote on all business and election of officers.

3. Each Branch shall be assessed twenty-five cents per member to provide for Provincial Expenses, printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of Speakers, and other items necessary for the proper administration of this organization. This shall be known as the Central Fund.

4. One fourth of the Branches having the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at the Annual Meeting. Five members shall constitute a quorum at the Executive Committee Meetings.

- A. At the Fall District Meetings, all Branches are requested to submit names for consideration by the Diocesan Nominating Committee for officers to be elected at the following Annual Meeting. It is the privilege of the Branches to submit names from any Branch in the Diocese without the consent of the persons named. The Chairman of each District shall send to the Chairman of the Diocesan Nominating Committee all names submitted at her District Meeting.
- B. It shall be the privilege of Branches and individual members to submit to the Chairman of the Nominating Committee names for consideration for officers to be elected. These names may be submitted at any time previous to six weeks before the Annual Meeting.
- C. The Nominating Committee shall present a ticket of one or more nominees for each office to be filled. The Chairman shall send this ticket to each Branch three weeks prior to the Annual Meeting. In addition to the ticket presented by this Committee, any nominations indorsed by three Branches and with the consent of the nominees may then be made. Such nominations shall be sent to the Chairman of the Nominating Committee one week prior to the Annual Meeting and the Chairman shall inform the Annual Meeting of any such names. Nominations may be made from the floor of the Annual Meeting by any delegate, provided the consent of the nominees has been obtained.
- D. The incoming President and the incoming Secretary of Christian Education, by virtue of their offices, shall be declared delegates one and two from the Diocese to the Triennial. A nominee from the Negro District, as representing the minority group in the Diocese, shall be elected delegate number three from the Diocese.
- E. The Nominating Committee shall submit a ticket including the names of the incoming President, the incoming Secretary of Christian Education and the nominee from the Negro District, together with three other nominations for delegates and six nominations for alternates to the Triennial. The alternate for delegate number three shall be a member of the Negro District.
- F. Nominations for both delegates and alternates may be made from the floor of the Annual Meeting.
- G. The election of alternates shall follow the announcement of the results of the balloting on delegates.

5. The Diocesan President shall appoint at the beginning of her second year of office the following Chairmen, to serve for three years: Chairman of Church Periodical Club; Interracial Chairman; Legislative Chairman; Missionary Correspondent; Chairman of Young Peoples' Work.

6. The District Officers shall correspond to the Diocesan Officers and shall be elected at the first meeting of the District after the Diocesan Annual Meeting.

The District Chairman shall appoint the following Chairmen, to serve for three years: (1) Church Periodical Club; (2) Prayer Partnership Correspondent; (3) Young People's Work, (4) *5*

7. Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be the authority in all questions of parliamentary law not covered by these By-Laws.

8. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates of any Annual Meeting.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

65th ANNUAL MEETING — WOMAN'S AUXILIARY Christ Church, Charlotte, April 27, 1949

The choice of the prayer, Bring The Nations Into Thy Fold, as the Theme for our 67th Annual Meeting is a recognition of the fact that the ecumenical movement in every area of life is the important trend of thought in the world to-day. May this prayer for the Mission of the Church have as its foundation in our hearts the spirit embodied in the 117th Psalm:

Praise the Lord, all ye nations; praise him all ye peoples. For his merciful kindness is ever more and more toward us; and the truth of the Lord endureth forever. Praise the Lord.

We look at our children and grandchildren and venture fearfully to imagine the problems that they as adults must face as an inheritance from us. If we cannot dwell on these thoughts, let us do with zeal our immediate tasks as they are presented to us as christian citizens; but more important than doing things is the urgency to be faithful and devoted soldiers and servants of Christ in this our time and place. We look unto Him as the Saviour of the World.

In this year of study and action drawing to a close we have had as a special Objective listed in the Year Book the formation of new branches or new groups of established branches. One strong new branch, St. Anne's of St. Mary's, High Point, has been welcomed into our Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary family while one rural branch at Grace Church, Lawrence, has been disbanded. It is more encouraging to look at the growth in total membership in the Diocese. This has grown from 3,466 in 1948 to 3,851 in 1949, an increase of over 10%. Diocesan officers see many evidences of the interest of women in the branches in the whole work of the Auxiliary, Diocesan and National.

Particularly are we conscious of growing strength in the Negro District during the past three years. Their most capable leaders show a comprehension of Auxiliary work and their responsibility and relationship to the whole Auxiliary that forecasts strength for the future. By a ruling of the 1946 Triennial Meeting the Diocese of North Carolina is privileged to have an additional delegate from the Negro branches to join with five other delegates in representing our diocese at the Triennial Meeting in San Francisco. If our Diocesan Auxiliary is strong, we must remember that this is only one aspect of the strength of the Church in the

Diocese of North Carolina. Still we have only touched the surface of our potentialities. We take stock of our advances in humility of heart, recognizing in them the fact that God is thus calling us to share in His plans for the extension of His Kingdom.

From an over-all viewpoint it would seem that we place an over-emphasis in our branches on earning money and an insufficient emphasis on the joy and sacramental significance of simple, quiet giving of our money. It remains for each branch to decide for itself whether or not this is true in its own life. There is a wholesome balance to be attained; and if you feel that you need to work nearer to an ideal for your finances, one method would be to emphasize Christian Education in giving in your programs. It is a constant task to keep before us the fact that our money is given as a means of glorifying God and thanking him for His mercy and is used to build churches and hospitals, to maintain schools, to pay salaries of men and women who give their whole lives to the work of the Church.

The appreciative letters received concerning the Quiet Day of Prayer and Meditation last Advent in the nine districts point to the wisdom of observing this Diocesan wide day again next year. A Quiet Day of Prayer and Meditation should have a prior claim to a date on our calendars that is suitable to the purpose of prayer, penance and meditation. We still may not have large crowds for this observance; but the genuine appreciation of those who had a part in the devotions this year indicates that they will bring others to share this spiritual feast in the future. We are most grateful to the clergy of the Diocese for their encouraging interest in this effort, particularly to those who were our leaders in the devotions.

We are now ending the period between Triennial Meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary. Your delegates will go to the meeting in San Francisco next September where they will share in the worship, thinking and discussion of representatives of the Woman's Auxiliary from all races and many countries. They must be conscious at all times of the mind of the women at home whom they represent; they must feel your deep concern in the events of that meeting. With new plans evolved there, with new Diocesan officers, there will be different emphases and fresh, invigorating viewpoints for these next three years. We must be quick to support these new officers, quick to seize new opportunities, use new and wise strategy in our work, and alert to catch broader visions of God's will for us as members of His Church.

At the noon hour, The Rt. Rev. M. George Henry, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese of Western North Carolina, conducted a meditation with prayers.

The Rt. Rev. Edwin A. Penick, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese of North Carolina, introduced The Rev. James W. Kennedy, D.D. of Christ Church, Lexington, Ky. Dr. Kennedy, an official reporter of the Episcopal Church to the Amsterdam Conference, spoke on the subject, "Pilgrim's Return from Amsterdam."

The President declared the session recessed for lunch.

The Meeting reconvened at 2:15 P.M.

Mrs. Roberts, Chairman, presented the following report of the Credentials Committee:

Mrs. Thomas McMillan moved that the report of the Credentials Committee be accepted. Miss Lillie Hill seconded, the motion was carried and the report accepted.

Mrs. Bourne explained that it was in order to elect a President at this meeting since the President-elect, Mrs. T. P. Thomas, found it necessary to resign.

The Secretary read Article VIII, Section C of By-Law 4 and By-Law 2 of the constitution concerning the election of officers.

Mrs. Hugo Walker, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the following names for Diocesan offices: President, Mrs. Edwin F. Lucas, Greensboro; Vice-President, Mrs. John W. Huddle, Chapel Hill; Secretary of Christian Education, Mrs. Rufus B. Jones, Charlotte; Representative on the Diocesan Council & Chairman of Youth Work, Mrs. Thomas McMillan, Rocky Mount.

The President called for nominations from the floor for each Diocesan Office to be filled. In each case it was duly moved that the rules be suspended and the Secretary be instructed to cast the unanimous ballot of the meeting for the names submitted by the nominating committee. In each case, the motion was duly seconded, carried, and the names submitted by Mrs. Walker were elected.

The Secretary read from the By-Laws of the 1946 Triennial Meeting relating to the number of delegates to Triennial Meeting accredited to each Diocese with minority groups. She also read sections D thru G of By-Law 4 to the constitution concerning the election of delegates and alternates to the Triennial Meeting.

Mrs. Walker as Chairman of the Nominating Committee read the requirements for delegates to Triennial Meeting as recommended by the National Executive Board.

Mrs. Walker then presented the following names as delegates to the Triennial Meeting of 1949: Mrs. Edwin F. Lucas, Mrs. Rufus B. Jones, Mrs. J. W. Black, Mrs. Henry C. Bourne, Mrs. William J. Gordon and Mrs. E. G. Peoples.

The President declared Mrs. Lucas and Mrs. Jones as delegates number one and two as stated in Section D of By-Law 4 of the constitution.

The President asked for nominations from the floor for delegate number three who must come from the Negro branches, as stated in Section D of By-Law 4. Mrs. Frank Shaw moved that the rules be suspended and the Secretary be instructed to cast the unanimous ballot of the meeting for Mrs. Black. It was seconded, carried, and Mrs. J. W. Black was elected delegate number three.

The President asked for nominations from the floor for the three remaining delegates to the Triennial Meeting, and the following names were presented: Miss Lillie Hill, Mrs. Pembroke Nash, Mrs. J. Laurens Wright, Mrs. Hugo Walker and Mrs. Springs McCoy.

Mrs. Wm. Steele moved, Mrs. James McKenzie seconded that the nominations for delegates be closed. The motion was carried.

Miss Martha Hall moved that the three names receiving the highest number of votes be declared the delegates and that in case of a tie the choice be made by lot. The motion was seconded. A motion was made to amend this motion by inserting the phrase, "the tie be broken by the presiding officer" in place of the phrase, "in case of a tie the choice be made by lot." Mrs. Landon Hill seconded the motion to amend and the motion was lost. The President then asked for the vote on the original motion. The original motion was carried.

Miss Hall, Chairman of the Elections Committee, reported the results of the balloting, and announced that Mrs. Henry C. Bourne, Mrs. E. G. Peoples and Mrs. Wm. J. Gordon were elected delegates to the Triennial Meeting.

Mrs. Walker presented the following names as alternates to the Triennial Meeting: Mrs. U. T. Holmes, Mrs. John Huddle,

Miss Constance Young, Mrs. James McKenzie, Mrs. T. P. Thomas and Mrs. Thomas McMillan.

The President asked for nominations from the floor for an alternate for delegate number three from the Negro branches. Mrs. Mack Ruffin moved that the rules be suspended and the Secretary be instructed to cast the unanimous ballot of the meeting for Miss Young. Mrs. Frank Spruill, Jr. seconded, the motion was carried, and Miss Constance Young was elected the alternate for delegate number three.

The President asked for nominations from the floor for the five remaining alternates to the Triennial Meeting, and the following names were presented: Mrs. Pembroke Nash, Mrs. James Lockhart, Mrs. Springs McCoy and Miss Lillie Hill.

It was moved that the nominations be closed. Mrs. Robert Correll seconded, and the motion was carried.

Mrs. Frank Shaw moved the five nominees receiving the highest votes be declared the alternates and that in case of a tie the choice be made by lot. The motion was seconded and carried.

The President asked for the vote on the five alternates, and the ballots were collected by the Elections Committee.

Mrs. Roberts as Chairman of the Finance Committee recommended that the offering at the Evening Service be given to Bishop Penick as a discretionary fund to be used for scholarships for Theological Education.

Mrs. M. W. Wall moved, Mrs. Frank Spruill, Jr. seconded that this recommendation for use of the offering be accepted. The motion was carried.

The President extended for Mrs. M. D. Whisnant, Matron of the Thompson Orphanage, an invitation to all delegates and visitors to an open house at the orphanage at the close of the afternoon session.

Mrs. Thomas McMillan moved that the meeting recess until the evening service at 8:00 P.M. The motion was seconded, carried and the President declared the Meeting recessed.

At the evening service Bishop Penick was assisted by the Rev. C. A. Cole, rector of St. Martin's, Charlotte. Bishop Penick preached the sermon.

At 7:30 A.M. April 28 there was a celebration of the Holy Communion with Bishop Penick as the celebrant, assisted by the Rev. Iveson Noland. At this service there was the presentation of the United Thank Offering and a commemoration of the departed by the use of the Auxiliary roll of remembrance.

At 9:45 A.M. the meeting reconvened with opening prayers led by the Rev. Mr. Noland.

Miss Hall moved that the President be authorized to fill the vacancies for delegates to the Triennial Meeting if it becomes necessary. Mrs. Victor Johnson seconded. The motion was carried.

Bishop Penick introduced the Rev. I. Stuart McElroy, District Secretary of the American Bible Society, who spoke to the meeting.

Noon Day prayers were led by Bishop Penick.

Mrs. Spring McCoy, Custodian of the U. T. O., announced that \$16,542.67 was the total amount of the U. T. O. presented at the early service, an increase of \$1,650.45 over the previous year. At this date the total triennial ingathering amounts to \$40,001.51 with the Fall 1949 offering still to be collected. She pointed to the comparison of this figure to the total 1946 triennial ingathering of \$39,060.69.

Mrs. Roberts as chairman of the Finance Committee announced that the Laura Clark Memorial Fund amounted to \$1,422.15, and recommended that the Laura Clark Memorial Fund for the Education of Grace Chen be dispensed by the Finance Committee in consultation with Miss Chen. Mrs. J. T. Carter moved that the recommendation be accepted. It was seconded, carried and this recommendation of the Laura Clark Memorial Fund was accepted.

Mrs. Roberts as Treasurer presented the Executive Board's recommendations for the allocation of a \$2,458.18 surplus from 1948, and she moved that said allocation of the surplus be adopted. Mrs. Huddle seconded, the motion was carried, and the allocation of the surplus was adopted.

Mrs. Roberts moved that 1950 Budget of the Woman's Auxiliary be increased from \$9000.00 to \$9500.00. Mrs. Huddle seconded and the motion was carried.

Mrs. Roberts presented the 1950 Diocesan Budget approved by the Executive Board, with \$4750.00 for items Outside the Diocese and \$4750.00 for items Inside the Diocese. She moved that the items for Outside the Diocese be adopted.

Mrs. Claude Morris moved to amend the budget by inserting after the word "Kanuga." the words, "In Memory of The Rt. Rev. John L. Jackson." Mrs. Wheeler seconded the amended motion and the amended motion was carried. The vote was then on the motion to adopt the budget as amended. It was seconded, carried, and this portion of the budget was adopted.

Mrs. Roberts moved that the items for Inside the Diocese be adopted. Mrs. Spruill seconded; it was carried and this portion of the budget was adopted.

Mrs. Roberts moved that the 1950 Epiphany Offering be sent to Bishop Penick as a Seminary Scholarship Fund to be used at his discretion, and that the 1950 Feast of the Purification Offering be used for furnishing the rectory of the Diocesan Missionary to the Deaf. Mrs. Spruill seconded.

Bishop Penick suggested that the Epiphany Offering be used at the discretion of either the Bishop or the Bishop Co-adjutor. Mrs. Roberts amended her original motion by this suggestion. It was seconded, and the motion was amended and carried.

Mrs. Frank Spruill, Jr. moved that the President and Treasurer be authorized to allocate to the delegates to the Triennial Meeting any funds already voted for that purpose by this body. It was seconded and the motion was carried.

Mrs. M. T. Ruffin, Chairman, presented the report of the Committee on Resolutions, and she moved that each of the five resolutions be adopted.

Motions to adopt resolutions numbers 1, 2 and 3 were duly seconded, and the resolutions were adopted.

Resolution number 4 reads as follows: "*Whereas*, The problem of Displaced Persons is one in which all Christians must accept responsibility; and *Whereas*, By virtue of resolutions adopted at the Triennial and at last year's Diocesan Meeting, we have shown our acceptance of this responsibility; therefore, *Be It Resolved*, That the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina goes on record as supporting legislation along this line such as the McGrath-Neely and Cellar bills which make needed changes in last year's bill and increases the number to be admitted; and *Be It Further Resolved*, That copies of this resolution be sent to our Senators and Congressmen." The motion to adopt the resolution was seconded and the resolution was lost.

Resolution number 5, as presented by the Committee, read as follows: "*Whereas*, the education of our children in our Churches is of utmost importance to us; and *Whereas*, the new program of work designated to be done by the National Council under Dr. John Huess is in dire need of funds; therefore, *Be It Resolved*, That the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina goes on record as approving that an outlay of funds for this purpose should be given prior consideration to that of funds for radio, so that our delegates may bear this in mind when attending the Triennial Meeting." After the discussion, Mrs. Ruffin was given permission to amend the original resolution by substituting for the "Be It Resolved" statement, the following: "*Be It Resolved*, That the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina goes on record as considering this new program to be of primary importance so that our delegates may bear this in mind when attending the Triennial Meeting." Mrs. Thomas McMillan seconded the motion to adopt the resolution as amended, and the resolution as amended was adopted.

Mrs. Garnett Saunders, Chairman, read the report of the Courtesy and Findings Committee. There being no objection the report was accepted.

The President announced that the Executive Board had voted to accept the invitation from St. Mary's, High Point for the Annual Meeting to meet there in 1950. Mrs. J. P. Armstrong of St. Mary's Auxiliary extended the formal invitation.

Mrs. McMillan made a motion to dispense with the reading of the minutes. It was seconded and carried.

Mrs. Thomas C. Powell moved that the Meeting give a rising vote of thanks to the Secretary for her 3 years' work. This was done.

Bishop Penick installed the newly elected Diocesan Officers; namely, Mrs. Edwin F. Lucas, President; Mrs. John W. Huddle, Vice-President; Mrs. Rufus B. Jones, Secretary of Christian Education; Mrs. Thomas McMillan, Rep. on the Diocesan Council and Chairman of Youth Work; and also Miss Jeanette Bledsoe, the newly appointed Secretary.

Mrs. Bourne handed the gavel to the new President, and Mrs. Lucas asked for any further business. Mrs. Wm. J. Gordon was given permission to bespeak the appreciation of the Auxiliary for the leadership of Mrs. Bourne.

Mrs. Thomas McMillan moved that the meeting be adjourned. Mrs. Frank S. Spruill, Jr. seconded, and Mrs. Lucas declared the 67th Annual Meeting adjourned.

Bishop Penick pronounced the benediction.

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED AT THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY ANNUAL MEETING

Christ Church, Charlotte, April 27-28

- I. *Whereas*, The Women of the Church, in Triennial assembled, laid stress on the need for silence in the Church's services, particularly before and after the Holy Communion, and

Whereas, We should remember the admonition, "The Lord is in His Holy Temple, Let all the earth keep silence before Him"; therefore,

Be It Resolved, That the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina will by personal example and the cooperation of their parishes forward the practice of silence and reverence in our churches; and

Be It Further Resolved, That we request this resolution be printed in the bulletin of each parish.

- II. *Whereas*, The Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church is primarily evangelistic in purpose and offers an avenue to membership in the Church; therefore,

Be It Resolved, That we, as members of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal

Church in the Diocese of North Carolina, seek out women not interested in any church with the hope that membership in the Woman's Auxiliary may bring them into the Church.

- III. *Whereas*, Racial and religious prejudice constitutes a menace to our National Unity, and is in direct violation of our Lord's command; therefore,

Be It Resolved, That we, the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina, shall endeavor to combat this menace by avoiding any thought, word or deed which might contribute to the fostering of intolerance.

- IV. *Whereas*, The education of our children in our churches is of utmost importance to us; and *Whereas*, the new program of work designated to be done by the National Council under Dr. John Huess is in dire need of funds; therefore,

Be It Resolved, That the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina goes on record as considering this new program to be of primary importance so that our delegates may bear this in mind when attending the Triennial Meeting.

The Missionaries themselves have voiced their satisfaction in what has been done. The local branches seem to be more missionary conscious and the National office has expressed gratification at the interest this Diocese manifests in its missionaries. Results have shown that the methods used have been effective. A new "Calendar for Missions" should be ordered and used by all correspondents.

N. C. STATE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

The State Capitol building still hums with the busy typewriters of the clerks and stenographers, compiling and putting in order the work of the 1949 Legislature. For awhile all of us thought there might not be a report from your Legislative representative, but adjournment came and though the ink isn't dry on any of these bills, I will be able to tell you how each of the 5 points in the program succeeded.

POINT 1.

Provide an effective system, with adequate financial support, for improving the enforcement of the compulsory school attendance law.

A machinery bill was passed which gives the counties funds for additional personnel, one of which *could* be a truant officer.

POINT 2.

Provide for minimum wage and maximum hour standards for women and minors.

This "point" has been a part of the program for several years and this is the first time it has ever come out of committee. It was killed as a bill on the floor but it did reach the Assembly.

POINT 3.

Provide for state participation in general assistance for persons between 18 and 65 years of age in need of financial assistance.

This passed.

POINT 4.

Provide through the School Health Coordinating Service for complete physical examinations for all school children at reasonable intervals with a definite plan of referrals for necessary follow-up treatment.

This bill passed and the method of enforcement is being worked out between the Board of Education and the Board of Health.

POINT 5.

Provide for strengthening the requirements and safeguarding the divorce laws, (this part passed), and in divorce proceedings involving children a definite plan for the care and custody of any child under 18 years of age must be presented to the judge hearing the case.

This failed to pass.

Yes, the Legislature for 1949 is over but already the State Legislative Council Steering Committee has started work on issues that need attention in the state. These proposals are being studied by trained groups and will be presented to the Steering Committee at its next meeting with their study. These may or may not make the program for 1951 but the State Legislative Council does not adjourn.

2. Norlina, which we thought lost to us, was visited and interest renewed. Monroe was at last reached.
3. Three interesting, spiritual "Woman's Day" programs were held—two fostered by Field Worker.
4. Through combined interest of Bishop Penick and St. Augustine's Chaplain, the Field Worker appeared as guest speaker at a Pre-Lenten service in St. Augustine's Vesper Service. By special invitation and permission, one visit on "Woman's Day Program" in St. James Church, Portsmouth, Virginia.

- III. Made tour of District in special meetings and slide showings on "Fellowship."
 Attended two planning conferences and one Department of Religious Education meeting.
 Plan to attend conference.
 Plan to attend Camp and study at "Windham House" this summer.

 2. A number of smaller branches in pledge classification.
 3. Supply quotas larger.
 4. United Thank Offerings run into hundreds of dollars.
 5. Some few branches made "Special Gifts."

 7. Stressing conference and camp attendance. More care and support of our church schools and church homes. Earnest prayer and work for consecrated leadership.
- Through Christian Fellowship we shall urge and continue to join the "Evangelism of all peoples" into one fold so that God's Peace can come to a needy world.

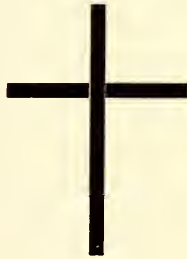

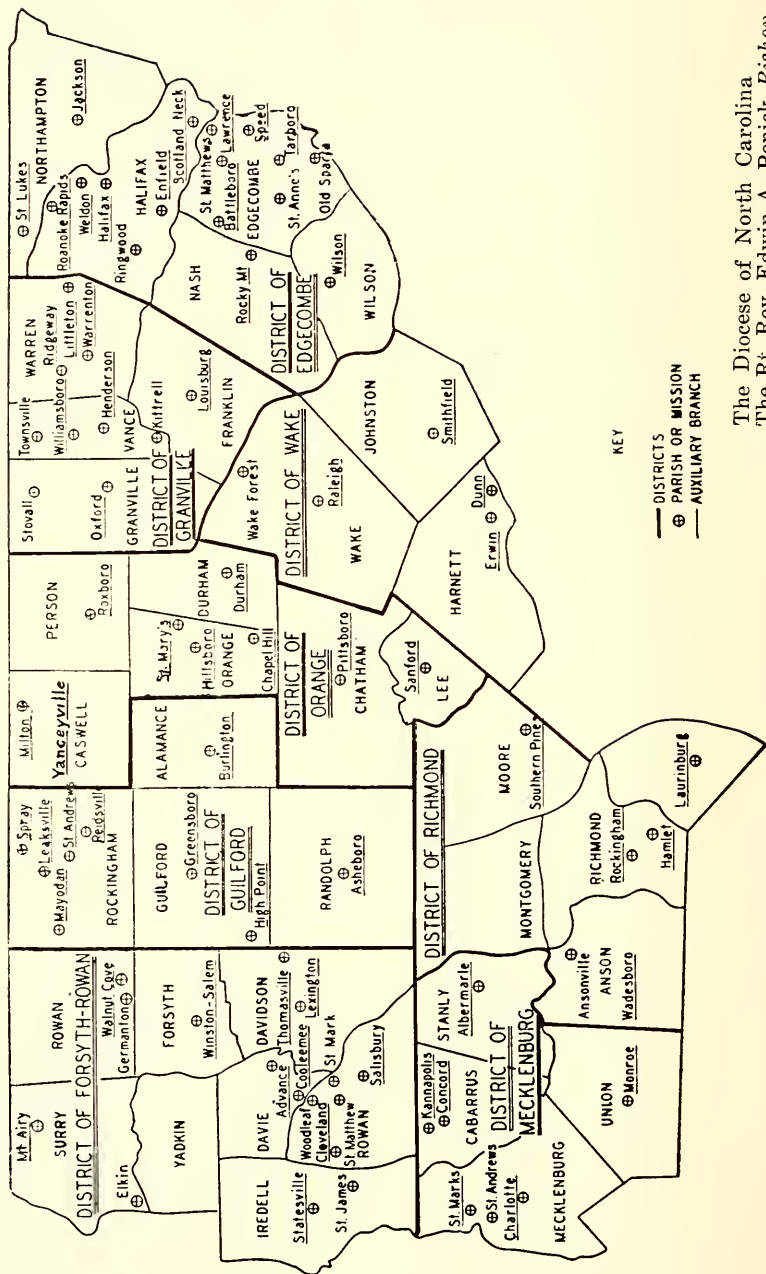

BRANCHES—YEAR 1950-51

WORSHIP: Ye are called to meet God in His Holy Temple.

1. Set aside part of each day for private meditation and prayers.
2. Have family prayers daily.
3. Observe absolute and reverent silence before and after church services. (See Resolution No. 1 adopted at the Annual Meeting).
4. Pray for the spirit of love in our individual lives and for the spirit of forgiveness in the common daily routine of life. (See Resolution No. 2 adopted at the Annual Meeting).
5. Request your minister to have at least one prayer for peace every Sunday. (See Resolution No. 7 adopted at the Annual Meeting).
6. Observe at least four corporate Communion services during the year.
7. Observe Intercessory Days with a corporate Communion or Worship service.
January 6, Feast of Epiphany.
February 2, Feast of the Purification.
8. Have a presentation service for the United Thank Offering in Spring and Fall.
9. Attend the Quiet Day of Prayer and Meditation in your district, December 8, the first Friday in Advent.
10. Observe prayer days sponsored by United Council of Church Women. (See Diocesan Calendar).
11. Plan devotions for your meetings so that they are an integral part of the program of the meeting.

STUDY: Ye are called unto the fellowship for truth-seekers.

1. Plan a program of study for the year in accordance with the recommendations of the Diocesan Secretary of Christian Education.
2. Plan each meeting to have each officer present current information concerning the work of her department in parish, community, diocese, nation or world.
3. Combat religious illiteracy by promoting classes to study the Bible, the Creed, the Sacraments and the Church.
4. Read and study the publications in "The Church's Teaching Series" singly and in groups.
5. Subscribe to and read *The N. C. Churchman*, *Churchways* and *Forth*.
6. Attend at least one summer conference.

SERVICE: Ye are called to be servants and friends of Jesus Christ.

1. Participate in campaigns for overseas relief.
2. Support the Thompson Orphanage and the Indian Mission in South Dakota with gifts and supplies.
3. Support such plans for Christian Social Service as are suggested by that department, particularly in the matter of Displaced Persons. (See Resolution No. 3 adopted at the Annual Meeting).
4. Respond to requests from Diocesan Supply Department.
5. Cooperate with local youth organizations.

GIFTS: Ye are called to be good stewards.

1. Stress the spiritual significance of the U. T. O. and the presentations at meetings of information concerning its use in the mission field. Place an offering of at least one cent a day in the Blue Box. (See Resolution No. 6 adopted at the Annual Meeting).
2. Contribute funds for Camp Delaney, the camp for negroes.
3. Tithe! And influence others to do likewise.
4. Contribute to International Christian University in Japan. (See Resolution No. 5 adopted at the Annual Meeting).
5. Encourage the acceptance by your vestry of the full Church's Program Quota for your congregation.
6. Endeavor to increase your pledge in December to the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary budget of January 1-December 31, 1951.

FELLOWSHIP: Ye are called unto companionship with Christ through the Church.

1. Re-awaken the interest of inactive members.
2. Recruit new members.
3. Sponsor the organization of new branches.
4. Promote at St. Mary's Episcopal Student Center, Greensboro, a program on organization and work of the Woman's Auxiliary. (See Resolution No. 4 adopted at the Annual Meeting).
5. Work more closely with the personnel secretary, seeking every opportunity to direct others into Church work as their life's work. (See Resolution No. 8 adopted at the Annual Meeting).
6. Strive for mutual strengthening of negro and white branches by closer cooperation in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary.
7. Aim for greater understanding between races, classes and creeds.
8. Bend every effort toward the achievement of unity on the local level, realizing that the Church is One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic.

ANALYSIS OF YEAR OF WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF DIOCESE

1. Fiscal year of Diocese and branches runs Jan. 1. to Dec. 31 because it must coincide with National Council fiscal year.
2. Year of active study and action runs from 1st meeting in Fall (Sept.) to last meeting before Summer recess (June). Reason: It must conform to the plans and material sent out from National headquarters, and to the Diocesan Annual Meeting which must be held in the favorable weather of Spring.
3. Summer is preparation period for activities to follow—it is the inactive first part of a new year of study and action.
4. New officers should be elected at a branch meeting prior to Annual Diocesan Meeting. Reasons: (a) New officers are taken into consideration in the election of delegates to the Annual Meeting, (b) New officers' names can be given on report of the year's study and action for publishing in year book.

5. New officers should be installed at last meeting before Summer recess (June meeting). A few branches meet during Summer. Their officers should also be installed at end of June meeting. New treasurer is actually installed in middle of fiscal year (see item 1 above) but this is much easier for her than taking office in January when she would immediately have to set up new pledges and budget.
6. Officers installed at June meeting spend Summer preparing for coming year of activity. Program of Christian Education should be prepared during this time.
7. New president presides at 1st Fall meeting (Sept). For branches meeting during Summer she presides at July meeting.
8. Report blanks are sent out to branches in March Diocesan President's letter. Reports cover period from previous July 1st to May 1st (as late in year as possible and yet in time for publishing in year book). Reports are mailed back to District Chairmen by April 25th. Lists of recently elected officers sent in on report then becomes correct in year book for longest period of year possible.
9. Year book is sent out in August, before if possible.
10. Annual Diocesan Meeting is the middle of April. This conforms to date of Diocesan Convention of the Church, and to the Bishop's schedule. Year's reports are not available for Diocesan officers for Annual Meeting, but "reports" at this meeting could consist of plans for the future and a general picture of work.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

68TH ANNUAL MEETING—WOMAN'S AUXILIARY
St. Mary's Church, High Point, April 19, 1950

As your president, I welcome you to the 68th annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina. It is a pleasure to see so many of you here and it is my earnest prayer that the two days ahead of us will prove of great value to us all.

Since our last meeting in Charlotte, six delegates, elected there, have attended the Triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in San Francisco where we were enabled to catch a world vision of our great Church and her work at home and abroad. The theme of that meeting was "Called Unto His Holy Fellowship." That theme we have adopted for our meeting here in High Point with particular emphasis on the word "Called."

We are called to worship, called to study, called to service, called to be good stewards and called unto His Holy Fellowship.

As the program unfolds before us, I trust that the application of this theme will be the resolve of each individual present, and that we will take home with us to our respective branches a deeper and wider meaning of these words.

There has been growth in our organization during the last year—growth materially and spiritually. But there has not been nearly enough. Our efforts must be increased. We could and should do very much more.

There are now 108 branches with a total membership of approximately 4,050. The newest branch is that of St. Mary's, Yanceyville, organized last summer. The budget was raised another \$500.00 for 1950 and, as your treasurer will tell you later, we have a surplus of over \$2,000.00 from the fiscal year of 1949. I never thought particularly of the personal, practical uses to which this money is put until I began to receive letters of thanks from the recipients. They have given me an insight into the worth of our efforts which is surprising and gratifying, and far surpassed my expectation. If each of you could read the letters, you would realize how greatly needed and appreciated are these funds, and you would rejoice that this money, contributed by you through your branches, is being used to further God's Kingdom on this earth and to bring others into the Fellowship.

An indication of the wide-spread interests of our women was evidenced at the fall district meetings when each district designated the offering for a different purpose—all worthy, may I add?

And, I have been assured by those who know, that the Woman's Auxiliary can rightfully claim a little credit for the success of the Church's every member canvass with its increased budget, a result of our studies of Stewardship in all our branches.

Spiritual growth has manifested itself in the fact that several branches began their year of study and action with a Quiet Day of Prayer in the parish. May I urge others to do likewise? There is an increased interest in study programs, and the observance of Lent has been more wide-spread and more genuine and sincere.

In 11 places in the diocese a Quiet Day of Prayer and Meditation was observed the first Friday in Advent. The attendance was disappointingly small. To those who did go, the benefits were incalculable. Please attend the next one—every one of you. Only by being present can you realize how helpful and inspirational this one day, given entirely to meditation and prayer, can be to you. May I quote one of the clergy who so generously gave of themselves to make this service possible?

“It is my sincere belief that unless the women of the Auxiliary learn how to pray and meditate, all the activities and programs will be of little or no value. As a Priest of the Church, I would like to put in a plea for increased emphasis on the spiritual life in the program of the Woman’s Auxiliary. It seems to me we spend too much time on the fringes and not enough on the heart and center of the Christian Life. . . These Quiet Days are a step in the right direction, and I hope that next year many more will attend.”

I think I need add nothing more to that eloquent plea for a deeper, inner spiritual life.

There seems to be a bottleneck in the flow of information which should reach every woman in the Auxiliary. I urge each of you branch presidents to attend assiduously to this most important duty of yours. “The last woman in the last pew” should know what is going on, and you, the branch presidents, can help immeasurably by seeing that the information contained in my letters is given to everyone, and that the pertinent content of the church publications, diocesan and national, is made known throughout your branch. We must know what we are doing, and why, before our real interest is aroused.

It has been my happy privilege to speak about the Triennial at all nine district meetings last fall, and to several branch meetings and to one men’s club gathering. I have also attended two board meetings of the board of managers of Kanuga, and one meeting of the board of Thompson Orphanage. And, of course, there have been innumerable conferences with committees and individuals within the diocese. I must not forget the Woman’s Auxiliary conference at Vade Mecum, nor the Adult Conference at Kanuga which were also pleasant and profitable additions to my official duties.

This message would not be complete without a recognition of the unflinching response and enthusiasm and invaluable aid I have received from my fellow officers during my first year in office and, indeed, from all the women with whom I have come in contact. Their cheerful willingness to undertake any task which is assigned to them and their splendid cooperation with me and with each other have been an inspiration to me.

Let us go forward together, let us listen more intently when we are called, and respond more readily, let us become members of the Holy Fellowship and, by so doing, let us lead others to our Lord and Master.

Bishop Penick introduced Miss Frances Query, Director of the North Carolina Council of Churches, who spoke on activities of the North Carolina Council of Church Women.

The report of the Credentials Committee was duly accepted.

Mrs. King, Chairman of Committee on Constitutional Changes was introduced. She recommended the Constitution be changed to read as follows:

Article IV, Section I. The officers of this organization shall be a President, a First Vice President, a Second Vice President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of Christian Education, a Secretary of Christian Social Relations, a Secretary of Supply, a Custodian of United Thank Offering.

Article V, Section 2. The First Vice President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have specified duties to be decided in conference with the President.

Article V, Section 3. The Second Vice President shall edit the Annual Report and Hand Book of Information of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of North Carolina.

Article V, Section 4. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist other officers in preparing and having printed the Annual Report, and at each Annual Meeting shall make a report.

Mrs. King moved the adoption of each of the above Constitutional Changes. It was seconded, carried and each change adopted. The Constitution will be amended to that effect.

Mrs. King recommended the following amendments to the By-Laws:

Section 4-F. The ticket presented by the Nominating Committee for delegates to Provincial Auxiliary Meetings shall include a name from Negro District as representing the minority group in the Diocese. An alternate for this delegate shall be named from the Negro District.

Section 5. When any office in the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina is declared vacant by the Executive Board, the acting Nominating Committee (being governed by Article VIII, Section I) shall present to the Executive Board a name or names to be elected by the said Board to fill the declared vacancy. Should a vacancy occur in the office of President, the First Vice-President shall serve until the next Annual Meeting, at which time an election shall be held for the unexpired term.

Mrs. King moved the adoption of the above changes. It was seconded and carried.

The present Sections 4-F and 4-G automatically become 4-G and 4-H respectively.

The present Section 5 automatically becomes 6 and it was moved, seconded and carried to add to this section "Chairman of Personnel." This is added at the end of section.

The present Section 6 automatically becomes 7 and it was moved, seconded and carried to add to this section "(4) Personnel." This is added at end of section.

The present Sections 7 and 8 automatically become Sections 8 and 9 respectively.

Mrs. McKenzie, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the following names for Diocesan offices: First Vice President, Mrs. E. G. Peoples, Oxford; Treasurer, Mrs. J. P. Armstrong, High Point; United Thank Offering Custodian, Mrs. William L. Steele, Jr., Raleigh; Representative of Diocesan Executive Council, Mrs. Allen Surratt, Newsome.

The President called for nominations from the floor for each Diocesan office to be filled. In each case it was duly moved that the rules be suspended and the Secretary instructed to cast the unanimous ballot of the meeting for names submitted by the Nominating Committee. In each case the motion was duly seconded, carried and the names submitted by Mrs. McKenzie were elected.

Mrs. McKenzie presented the following names as delegates to the Provincial meeting: Mrs. Edwin F. Lucas, Mrs. Rufus B. Jones, Mrs. James T. Taylor, Mrs. J. P. Armstrong, Mrs. Hugo Walker and Mrs. Thomas McMillan.

The President asked for nominations from the floor and the following name was submitted: Mrs. James R. McKenzie.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the nominations be closed.

Mrs. Lucas declared by virtue of office the President is automatically delegate number one.

Mrs. Henry C. Bourne, Tarboro, moved the rules be suspended and the Secretary be instructed to cast the unanimous ballot of the meeting for Mrs. Taylor as Delegate number two from the minority group. This was seconded, carried and Mrs. Taylor was elected delegate number 2.

The President asked for the vote on the delegates and the ballots were collected by the Elections Committee.

Mrs. Roberts as Chairman of the Finance Committee moved the offering of the evening service be given to Lt. Col. Paul Rusch who will speak on the Brotherhood of St. Andrew in Japan to be used at his discretion. It was seconded and motion carried.

Mrs. Powell Alexander, St. Mary's, High Point, extended an invitation to delegates to attend the Tomlinson Furniture Company's Show Rooms and the meeting recessed until 8 p. m.

At the evening service Bishop Penick was assisted by The Rev. Thomas J. C. Smyth and The Rev. Carl Herman, St. Andrew's, Greensboro. Lt. Col. Paul Rusch spoke.

At 7:30 a. m. April 20 there was a celebration of the Holy Communion with Bishop Penick as the celebrant, assisted by the Rev. Thomas J. C. Smyth. At this service there was the presentation of the United Thank Offering and a commemoration of the departed by the use of the Auxiliary Roll of Remembrance.

At 9:45 a. m. the meeting reconvened with a hymn and opening prayers led by The Rev. Robert E. Cox of Holy Trinity, Greensboro.

The President extended appreciation to the organist, Mr. James Bergen.

The President introduced Mr. Fred Ferris, lay reader, who was representing the Auxiliaries of Yanceyville and Roxboro.

Mrs. J. M. M. Gregory, Jr., Chairman of the Elections Committee, reported the results of the balloting for delegates to the Provincial meeting as follows: Mrs. Rufus Jones, Mrs. J. P. Armstrong, Mrs. Hugo Walker.

Mrs. McKenzie presented the following names as alternates to the Provincial meeting: Mrs. Matt Wall, Mrs. B. R. Roberts, Mrs. J. W. Black, Mrs. Ned B. Ball, Miss Martha Hall and Mrs. Hobart Steele.

Mrs. Temple Graves moved since Mrs. Black was only representative of the minority group that the rules be suspended and the Secretary be instructed to cast the unanimous ballot of the meeting for Mrs. Black. It was seconded, carried and Mrs. Black was elected the alternate for delegate number 2.

The President asked for nominations from the floor for the remaining alternates to the Provincial meeting and the following names were presented: Mrs. James R. McKenzie, Mrs. James Beckwith, Mrs. Thomas McMillan and Mrs. James Conway.

Mrs. Sidney B. Allen moved the nominations be closed. It was seconded and the motion was carried.

The President asked for the vote on the alternates and the ballots were collected by the Elections Committee.

Mrs. McCoy moved there be five rather than six ingatherings in this present triennium. It was seconded and carried.

Mrs. Roberts, Treasurer, announced the evening offering amounted to \$286.30 which will be presented to Lt. Col. Rusch with a \$50 contribution from an Auxiliary branch.

Mrs. Roberts presented the Executive Board's recommendations for the allocation of a \$2,809.43 surplus from 1949 and she moved that said allocation of the surplus be adopted. Mrs. Peoples substituted a motion to amend the third item in the amount of \$400 for Triennial Reserve, allocating this for the work of Lt. Col. Paul Rusch in Japan. It was seconded and motion was carried.

Mrs. Bourne moved to amend Allocation of Surplus, item four, "Vade Mecum for Lights in Chapel," adding, "In thankfulness of the Episcopacy of the Rt. Rev. Edwin A. Penick, D. D." It was seconded and motion was carried.

The Secretary was asked to read Article IX, Section 2 of the Constitution: "From the total amount pledged towards the budget, one-half shall apply to the work of the National Council, one-half to the work of the Diocese." Some delegates interpreted the surplus was not equally divided and it was moved and seconded the Finance Committee withdraw from the meeting and draft a new allocation of the 1949 surplus to comply with the Constitution. This motion was not carried.

There was a motion to adopt the 1949 surplus as amended by Mrs. Peoples and Mrs. Bourne. This was seconded and carried.

Mrs. Roberts presented the 1951 Diocesan Budget approved by the Executive Board with \$5,500 for items Outside the Diocese and \$5,500 for items Inside the Diocese. She moved that the items for Outside the Diocese be adopted. This was seconded and motion was carried.

Mrs. Roberts moved that the items for Inside the Diocese be adopted. It was seconded and carried.

Mrs. Roberts moved that the 1951 Epiphany Offering be sent to Bishop Penick as a Seminary Scholarship Fund to be used at his discretion. This was seconded and carried.

Mrs. Roberts moved the 1951 Feast of the Purification Offering be used for the work of Miss Jocelyn Gordon in India. This was seconded and carried.

Mrs. John Richardson, Chairman, presented the report of the Committee on Resolutions and moved that each of the nine resolutions be adopted. Motions to adopt the nine resolutions were duly seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Pembroke Nash, Tarboro, Chairman, read the report of the Courtesy and Findings Committee. There being no objection, the report was accepted.

The President announced the Executive Board had voted to accept the invitation from St. Philip's, Durham, for the Annual Meeting to meet there in 1951. Mrs. J. M. M. Gregory, Jr., of St. Philip's Auxiliary extended the formal invitation.

The President announced the appointment of Chairmen of standing committees as follows: Mrs. John Richardson, North Carolina Legislative Council; Mrs. J. W. Black, Interracial; Mrs. J. P. Hall, Personnel; Mrs. Julian Robertson, Missionary Correspondent; Mrs. Paul Fulton, Church Periodical Club.

Mrs. McMillan suggested that resolutions adopted be presented on a separate page of the year book so they will be brought to the attention of everyone in the Diocese.

Mrs. George Newby, Jr., Rocky Mount, moved the President appoint a committee to investigate the possibility of reinstating a Building and Loan fund for graduates of Thompson Orphanage. This was seconded and motion carried.

There was a motion to dispense with the reading of the minutes. It was seconded and carried.

Mrs. McMillan moved that the meeting be adjourned after installation of officers. It was seconded and carried, after which Bishop Penick addressed the meeting and installed the following newly elected officers: Mrs. E. G. Peoples, First Vice President; Mrs. J. P. Armstrong, Treasurer; Mrs. William L. Steele, Jr., United Thank Offering Custodian; Mrs. Allen Surratt, Representative on Diocesan Executive Council; Mrs. W. Johnson King, Sr., Second Vice President who is completing this term vacated last fall.

Bishop Penick pronounced the benediction.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

The Episcopal Church has more than 250 institutions and agencies scattered throughout the United States which were established by church men and women who believed that concern for their neighbors was a necessary part of their worship of God.

The church is the only institution which can meet completely the challenge of the times. Christianity is a social religion. It is not a way of life for one man living alone, but for all men living together. It has a social nature as well as a spiritual one. We emphasize the eternal values of the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man, and in so doing, the earning of bread is reduced to its place as a means to a greater end, the end of serving God.

Interest in Christian Social Relations seems to be steadily mounting in our diocese. Splendid work has been done during the past year and we go forward with confidence to even greater participation in a program of worship, study, and service. All activity starts within the branch and it is within the power of every parish to serve its community better. There is danger that in our zeal to better conditions in our community, we may lose sight of opportunities in areas where people undergo suffering and privation that we will never know.

The size of the branch will determine the number of projects to be attempted, but at least one effort should be made under each heading of worship, study, and service.

SUPPLY

Undoubtedly there are some of you in this audience who are new in Auxiliary work and are not familiar with what is done by the Supply Department. There are others, I am sure, who may have it confused with the work of the Christian Social Relations Department. Therefore, I shall repeat some of what I said last year in an effort to define the work and the responsibilities of the Supply Department.

The Supply work of the Woman's Auxiliary is to provide for certain material needs of our various missions and institutions, both at home and abroad. These needs come under the headings of clothing, household and institutional furnishings, surgical supplies and occasionally vestments and altar linens for which the requesting mission has not sufficient funds.

In the past all assignments were made to each diocese by the National Supply Department which had evaluated the needs and the requests of the missionaries in charge. This year, however, our diocese, at the request of the National Supply Department has fallen into step with other progressive dioceses and has taken on the responsibility of filling the needs of our own diocesan institutions which heretofore have been assigned to other dioceses throughout the country. This has meant taking over virtually all of the linen needs of the two negro hospitals: St. Agnes, Raleigh, and the Good Samaritan, Charlotte. To them you have sent huge quantities of hospital garments, blankets, sheets, pillow cases, towels, layettes, etc. The administrators of the hospitals tell me that the articles sent them were so badly needed that in every instance they were put to immediate use without even reaching the shelves of the hospital supply closets where reserve quantities are kept.

In assuming the responsibility for our own institutions we did not feel that we would be following Christ's teachings if we failed to minister to those in need outside our dioceses as well. Therefore, we also accepted an assignment for an Indian mission at Sisseton, South Dakota. We have sent the Indians there all manner of wearing apparel, which was purchased in time to reach them for Christmas. The missionary in charge, The Rev. Earl Kneebone, was overjoyed and most appreciative of having this much needed clothing to distribute for Christmas.

Here in our diocese where the Thompson Orphanage is dear to our hearts it delights me to tell you that we were able to give Mr. Whisnant \$200.00 with which to start a fund for the purchase of new beds for the entire orphanage. Those of you who were visitors at the orphanage after Mrs. Whisnant's tea during the annual meeting last year will recall those sunken old beds and will realize how vital is the need for new ones to replace them.

The Tuttle Community Center in Raleigh which does splendid settlement work among the negroes of that city as well as the Thompson Orphanage and Sisseton Indian Mission, all received boxes of excellent used clothing from the whole diocese. That clothing is of inestimable value in the work of these institutions and we should not lose sight of the importance of its being serviceable and in really good condition.

A check for \$65.00 was sent to the Supply Secretary's Gift Fund. This fund replaces the former presents of personal clothing sent to missionaries and their families, to widows of missionaries and lay workers. These gifts are now made by check to the individual shortly before Christmas. They are accompanied by a letter explaining that they are made possible by the interest of the women of the Church.

This report is not so much an account of what the Supply Department Committee has done as it is a report of what *you* have done. Each District Supply Secretary and, through you, each Branch Supply Secretary has responded willingly to the requests made of you. This year our diocese has accomplished in round numbers fully three times as much as last year. We are growing up in the Supply work and I am filled with enthusiasm for the accomplishments of the year just ended.

Next year will require the same effort and cooperation if we are to continue to grow and carry on our responsibilities. Please remember this in planning your budgets and your work. Let us never forget that in this way we are given the joy and satisfaction of knowing that we are contributing to the comfort of those who are sick and to those who are in need of our help.

SUGGESTIONS FOR THE SUPPLY SECRETARIES

1. Make every effort to integrate your work with that of the Christian Education Department.
2. Avail yourselves of the help that department can give you and your Auxiliary members in learning about the missions and countries to which you may be sending supplies.
3. Make every effort to see that each member of each branch is given an opportunity of knowing and understanding the needs of the institutions and missions of this Diocese, as well as those in the foreign or domestic mission field.
4. When, of necessity, changes are made in personnel of officers during the year, promptly notify your District Secretary and in turn the Diocesan Secretary, so as to save valuable time in getting material and information to the correct person and thereby eliminate the necessity of repeating the procedure.
5. Strive for a better understanding of your members of the distinction between the work of the Department of Christian Social Relations and the Supply Department.
6. Always be prompt in furnishing assignments and particular about sending in report forms, using these according to the instructions given on each blank. The correct use of the report forms and the enclosure cards for each shipment to any institution or mission is of utmost importance to ensure credit being given to the branch making shipment.

REPORT OF THE UNITED THANK OFFERING

After three years as Custodian of the United Thank Offering, I give up my office with deepest regret. Each year has increased my sense of privilege in serving with the hundred and more branch and district custodians who have conscientiously and devotedly caused this Offering to grow in spiritual depth and financial increase.

The culmination and reward to me of three years of U. T. O. work was in being at the General Convention in San Francisco to present our Offering on the Golden Alms Basin and seeing and hearing the missionaries who are the recipients of our prayers and contributions. A panorama of the Church's work was spread before our eyes and the U. T. O. is a tremendous part of that splendid work.

One of the great addresses made at the Convention was by Bishop Stephen Neill who is assistant to the Bishop of Canterbury and a former missionary to India. He said, "Naturally, I am a fanatic on the subject of missionary work overseas. My ideal for the Church is that one communicant in every hundred should be a missionary in the non-Christian world, and that the other ninety-nine should be raising funds to support him. Perhaps such an ideal is too high for the ordinary Church to contemplate, so let us suppose that one in every five hundred should be set apart for missionary work. I am afraid that a budget on that basis, presented to the Presiding Bishop, would cause the poor man a violent heart attack." "But," he says, "I believe that it is you, the women of the Church, who must call the Church back to the spirit of high adventure. We who have been missionaries spend our time gnashing our teeth over the apparent trivialities of the Church in a time of crisis and peril with which we are faced today."

The triennial goal of \$2,000,000 was reached and was a cause for great rejoicing. However, a statistician at the Convention figured out that if every woman in the Church gave the small sum of 1 cent a day, or \$3.65 a year, we could place \$5,000,000 on the Altar at the next Convention. Our own Diocesan contribution for the three years was \$47,046.24 with a carry-over of about \$1,100 from the Fall Ingathering. Our Spring Ingathering so far amounts to \$8,407.87. The total for the year is \$16,208.60. I recommend that because of the good nucleus of \$1,100 carried over from the last triennium, we would have only five Ingatherings this next triennium, thereby eliminating a hurried Fall Ingathering the year of the Convention.

In this United Thank Offering there are countless sacrifices known only to God. We know what is done with the funds but we can never know how God uses the hidden acts of sacrifice and prayer that accompany them. Let us search our hearts and compare our own spirit of thankfulness with that of the poor leper woman in a Philippine mission who came to a United Thank Offering service with \$25.00 saved from her meager government allowance and saying, "I wish to express my thankfulness to Christianity which has taught me to be patient, though I am blind and have no hands and feet." As we offer all our countless

tiny sacrifices to God, we offer to Him ourselves in loving surrender, that our gifts may become fruitful in His service.

In reviewing reports from several Youth Work Secretaries several facts have become apparent. Some have reported that they have active and interested groups; others, that they cannot interest the children; others, that they have too few children with which to do any active work;—but always, somewhere in the report the cry is “We lack adult interest and leadership.”

I realize that figures or statistics are tiresome, but I do want to call your attention to this fact. From the most accurate figures which are available to me, there are in this Diocese about 7,000 children, and around 4,000 members of the Woman’s Auxiliary. Of course, not all of these 4,000 are active, but with few exceptions, all 7,000 of the children are. What a field for service, and an opportunity for us to put into practice that for which we pray in our Auxiliary prayer “work for the extension of Thy Kingdom”. These children are looking to us for leadership, guidance, inspiration and example. Surely, from our 4,000 we can recruit capable, talented, and interested leaders for our Youth—and we are not limited to the women of the Church. We can use our influence to interest the men of the Church in leading Youth activities.

I want to urge each branch to try to send some of its young people to the Camps at Vade Mecum this year. At the camps the children are provided with the very best talent for the religious education. (Just imagine what private camps would have to charge if they were able to employ such people as the Revs. Tom Smythe, Moultrie Moore, and Miss Eleanor Snyder, to name just a very few of those who are associated with the camps.) Try to persuade your parish or individuals in it to provide scholarships to the camps, and in order for Camp Delaney to get the start it needs in interesting their boys and girls in attending, provide scholarships for the Negro Youth of your community to attend Camp Delaney, which I am happy to say has undergone extensive improvements. The donation of scholarships is a wonderful opportunity for those people who are interested in youth work, but who are unable, for different reasons, to take an active part in it.

We hear too much nowadays of the waywardness and “care-nothing” attitude of our Youth. Let me remind you that children, being human beings, do not change. It is our attitude toward them, our approach to their problems, and our emphasis on what the world considers important which have changed. It is our challenge and our duty to guide and direct them into wanting to fill their place in the Church, and in equipping them to assume their responsibilities as citizens in the world and in the Kingdom of God.

The Church Periodical Club is one of the co-operating agencies of the National Council and represents a vital but much neglected section of our Missionary endeavor. As a Diocese we have been active in sharing our magazines, Bibles, Prayer Books and Hymnals locally, but have not informed ourselves as to the full scope of this work. We are thus depriving ourselves of the privilege of contributing to a project which is making the tools of Christian teaching available to every one and to every institution.

The important project for this Triennial is 'The Books Fund'. We know that in order to maintain a high standard, Universities, Colleges and Hospitals must have the necessary technical books, text books and periodicals. Such books cannot be included in the regular appropriations to these institutions, so they turn to the C. P. C. to provide this much needed assistance. There are definite requests for certain books and periodicals in the C.P.C. files at National Headquarters. The National Office is always glad to send you the names of those to whom such gifts may be sent. They will also send you a Manual, price 25 cents, and a pamphlet 'Share With Them' which will be guides for doing this work in your Auxiliary. The address is:

REPORT OF MISSIONARY CORRESPONDENT

In nearly every branch of the Auxiliary the missionary correspondents have been active and all Auxiliary members are alive to their missionary obligations.

An experiment was tried this year, namely, that of providing a monthly news bulletin to aid the branch correspondents. This served as a clearing house for letters from missionaries, and also as a medium for suggestions and reminders to the correspondents. These bulletins were likewise sent to the missionaries, who were thus informed of the work that other women and men are doing in the field, and made aware of the deep concern felt for them by the folks back home.

During the year, many kodak and other pictures were accumulated, and combined into a large scrap book. This book is dedicated to the President, Mrs. Edwin F. Lucas, and will be put in some place of easy access for future reference, as a pictorial history of one year's work in the mission field.

There is untold satisfaction in dealing with enthusiastic district chairmen, and branch leaders, and deeply appreciative missionaries. In a sense this department may be thought of as undergirding the whole Auxiliary, for it knits all the other departments into a definite unity of purpose; it puts into practice the theory of human fellowship; and draws us all nearer to the goal of that fellowship unto which we are so graciously called by Christ, himself, who said, "Ye have not chosen me, but I have chosen you."

SUGGESTIONS FOR MISSIONARY CORRESPONDENTS

The study of the Year Book is a vital part of every guild officer's work, to learn the aims of the Auxiliary, and its plans for accomplishing them. The Missionary Correspondent's objective is to create deeper interest in missionary work. At the very first, select at least one missionary from our list, for special attention during the year. Then study about them, write to them, and pray for them. Have each member aid you, and do not do all the work by yourself. Perhaps the members have already waited a long time for such a chance.

PRAYERS: a, Offer prayers for missionaries at each meeting.
b, And in your own private devotions.
c, Remind the rector to have mission prayers at Corporate Communion.

As an aid, "The Calendar of Prayer for Missions", a 25 cent pamphlet from the Church Missions House, is indispensable. It covers the whole world, and is brought up-to-date each year, with details on the individual missionaries.

LETTERS: Have all members of the guild aid in writing often to your chosen missionary, or missionaries, sending greeting cards for birthdays, and festival occasions. Send gifts whenever possible. Sign without fail, if even just the name of the guild, for "the gift without the giver is bare".

READING: "An informed church is a strong church!" Keep this slogan before you. Read three or four Church papers regularly for information, and to provide material for short, lively programs at every meeting. See suggestions under "Christian Education" in this Book. Throw in as many filmstrips and projector slides as practicable.

N. C. STATE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

With State Legislation, you are either looking backward to what has been done and what has been left undone, or to a coming legislature to try again on the undones and add a few new ones to the list. The choice of what is most needed in the field of social legislation is large, but by years of experience it has been found by the North Carolina Legislative Council, that it is better to hammer hard on 5 or 6 points than to try to reform all fields at once. With two years between sessions, it is sometimes discouraging, but to Raleigh citizens it seems the flood of legislators is always with us.

The following items are carried over from 1949:

1. Provide an effective system, with adequate financial support, for improving the enforcement of the compulsory school attendance law.
2. Provide for minimum wage and maximum hour standards for women and minors.
3. Provide that in divorce proceedings involving children a definite plan for the care and custody of any child under 18 years of age must be included in the order of the judge hearing the case.

These are additional items proposed for 1951:

4. Abolish the fee system in lieu of salary for operation of jails and for enforcement of the criminal laws.
5. Increase the jurisdiction of the juvenile court as to include children 16 years of age.
6. Abolish the death penalty for arson and burglary.

I hope each branch secretary of Christian Education will again this year receive with her material a leaflet with these reasons for inclusion in this program. Please try to include them in your year's program.

Thank you for taking me as your representative on the Legislative Council for the past four and a half years. To work with all of you in this small capacity has been a privilege I shall never forget.

SECTION IV

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED AT THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY
ANNUAL MEETING

St. Mary's Church, High Point, April 19-20

- I. *Whereas*, The Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council in the Diocese of North Carolina recognizes the extreme importance of cultivating the devotional life of the members,
Be It Resolved, that absolute silence before and after church services be observed. To this end, the practice of reading the hymns, proper psalms, epistle, and gospel, and the Form of Family Prayer is suggested as excellent preparation and the means of maintaining a reverent silence.
Be It Further Resolved that this resolution be inserted in the church bulletin of each parish from time to time.
- II. *Whereas*, the peace of this world is dependent almost wholly on the spread of the Gospel throughout the world, and
Whereas, the responsibility of peace resides largely with us, as individual citizens of the world, and
Whereas, little progress will be made towards lasting world peace unless we as individuals will allow ourselves to be led and loved by God, now therefore,
Be It Resolved that each person in this assembly will return to her parish and to her home, with a new determination to assume the privilege of carrying on the Lord's program of love in every day life, and
Be It Further Resolved that we show the spirit of forgiveness in the common routines of life, that we refrain from criticism in thought or word of our church, our ministers, our fellow workers, and
Be It Further Resolved that we shall make every effort to love the unlovable, whoever they may be in our lives.
- III. *Whereas*, the Quota of Displaced Persons accepted by the General Convention of our Church is 1,200 and the number assigned to the Diocese of North Carolina is twenty with the hope that it may be oversubscribed, therefore
Be It Resolved that the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese urge that all branches constitute themselves a group to place as many D. P.'s in their respective communities as possible.
- IV. *Whereas* the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council in the Diocese of North Carolina desires an informed and ever increasing membership; and whereas we recognize St. Mary's House, the Episcopal Student Center at the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina as a potential source of future interested and informed members of the Auxiliary; therefore
Be It Resolved that the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council in the Diocese of North Carolina promote at St. Mary's House a program on the organization and the work of the Auxiliary; and

Be It Further Resolved that we of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council in the Diocese of North Carolina urge the several branches to acquaint the girls of their parishes with St. Mary's House, to write to the student worker concerning them, and in any other way show an interest in the group at St. Mary's House.

- V. *Whereas* the National Council has given wholehearted approval to the establishment of an International Christian University in Japan,
Be It Resolved that the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council in the Diocese of North Carolina commend this project to its members that they may be moved to contribute generously to this undertaking.
- VI. *Whereas* it was brought to the attention of the Annual Meeting that an offering of one penny a day would increase the offering in a triennium from two million dollars to five million dollars, therefore
Be It Resolved that the women here assembled bring this fact to the attention of their United Thank Offering Custodians and urge its adoption in every parish.
- VII. *Whereas* the cause of peace in the world is the most pressing problem of all people everywhere, therefore
Be It Resolved that every minister in the diocese be requested to have at least one prayer for peace every Sunday.
- VIII. *Whereas* The Woman's Auxiliary should have a better understanding of Personnel work, and
Whereas each member should be given an opportunity to share in the responsibility and promotion of this work, therefore
Be It Resolved that Personnel be removed from the status of a special Committee and established as a Department of Personnel with the Diocesan Chairman thereby becoming a Secretary of Personnel, and with District and Parish each following the same procedure, to create a better means through which to carry out the work.
- IX. *Whereas* we believe that a great many of the periodicals and books found on our newsstands are degrading to our citizenry, particularly to our youth
Be It Resolved that the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina, in convention assembled, request that the Legislative Committee study this problem with a view to taking whatever steps are necessary towards the control and distribution of such degrading periodicals and books in our State.

SECTION V

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be, "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

ARTICLE II

Object

The object of this organization shall be to help in carrying out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church: Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service.

ARTICLE III

Membership

The membership of this organization shall be composed of all Parish and Mission Branches within the Diocese.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: A President, a First Vice-President, a Second Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of Christian Education, a Secretary of Christian Social Relations, a Secretary of Supply, a Custodian of United Thank Offering.

Section 2. These officers with the District Chairmen, members of the Executive Council and Chairmen of Standing Committees shall constitute the Executive Board and shall meet at least twice a year at the call of the President.

ARTICLE V

Duties of Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for. She shall also preside at meetings, and at every Annual Meeting shall address the Auxiliary. She shall make a report to the Diocesan Convention.

Section 2. The First Vice-President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have specific duties to be decided in conference with the President.

Section 3. The Second Vice-President shall edit the Annual Report and Handbook of Information of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of North Carolina.

Section 4. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist other officers in preparing and having printed the Annual Report and at each Annual Meeting shall make a report.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering and Box Work money, and shall

make a report of same to the Annual Meeting. At the end of every fiscal year the Treasurer's accounts shall be verified by a public auditor. The Treasurer's report, as audited, shall be published in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Section 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Education shall promote and stimulate educational work in the branches of the Diocese by every means in her power, and carry out the program of the National Department of Religious Education.

Section 7. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Relations shall co-operate with the Christian Social Relations Departments of the Diocese and the National Council, in the promotion of their plans and programs.

Section 8. The Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in the Spring and Fall of each year, and shall remit immediately for investment to the Treasurer of the National Council.

Section 9. The Secretary of Supply shall have charge of the work of the Supply Department.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. All Diocesan officers shall be elected for a term of three years. The Treasurer and the United Thank Offering Custodian to be elected at the first annual meeting after the Triennial; the President, Secretary of Supply, and Secretary of Christian Social Relations to be elected at the second annual meeting after the Triennial; the President to take office at the third annual meeting after the Triennial; Vice-President and Secretary of Christian Education to be elected at the third meeting after the Triennial.

Section 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President.

ARTICLE VII

Districts

Section 1. For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into districts.

Section 2. A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman duly elected by her District for a term of three years. In case of vacancy the Vice-Chairman shall serve as Chairman.

Section 3. Each District shall hold at least one and, if possible, two meetings a year.

ARTICLE VIII

Election of Diocesan Officers

Section 1. Prior to the Annual Meeting, the President shall appoint from the Executive Board a nominating committee of three who shall consider proposed nominees to fill the elective offices at the Meeting, and from the names suggested or considered the Committee shall recommend to the Meeting the nominees for such offices. The consent of the nominees shall be obtained by the Committee before making the recommendation. Nominations may be made from the floor of the Meeting by any delegate provided the

consent of the nominee has been first obtained. A majority vote shall be required for all elections. In case there are more than two nominees for the same office and no candidate receives a majority vote, the name receiving the smallest number of votes shall be dropped from the ballot.

Section 2. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund for Calendar Year preceding the meeting.

ARTICLE IX

Finance

The Executive Committee in consultation with the Bishop shall prepare a budget for the year. The budget shall be presented to the branches for their support at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Section 2. From the total amount pledged towards the budget, one-half shall apply to the work of the National Council, one-half to the work of the Diocese.

Section 3. The United Thank Offering and contributions for the Supply Department shall be in addition to the payments on the budget.

ARTICLE X

Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present, provided a written copy of the proposed amendments has been filed with the Diocesan Secretary, and a notice of same mailed to each branch by the Secretary at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting.

BY-LAWS

The place and time of the Annual Meeting shall be approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

1. The order of Business for the Annual Meeting shall be arranged by the President and the Executive Committee.

2. Each Parish Branch having fifty members or less shall be represented by the Branch President and one other delegate (appointed by the President or elected by the Branch). The President, or her representative, and the delegates each has a vote. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the Branch to an additional delegate with power to vote. The Diocesan Officers, District Chairmen, and the Chairmen of Standing Committees shall be empowered to vote on all business and election of officers.

3. Each Branch shall be assessed twenty-five cents per member to provide for Provisional Expenses, printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of Speakers, and other items necessary for the proper administration of this organization. This shall be known as the Central Fund.

4. One fourth of the Branches having the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at the Annual Meeting. Five members shall constitute a quorum at the Executive Committee Meetings.

- A. At the Fall District Meetings, all Branches are requested to submit names for consideration by the Diocesan Nominating Committee for officers to be elected at the following Annual Meeting. It is the privilege of the Branches to submit names from any Branch in the Diocese without the consent of the persons named. The Chairman of each District shall send to the Chairman of the Diocesan Nominating Committee all names submitted at her District Meeting.
 - B. It shall be the privilege of Branches and individual members to submit to the Chairman of the Nominating Committee names for consideration for officers to be elected. These names may be submitted at any time previous to six weeks before the Annual Meeting.
 - C. The Nominating Committee shall present a ticket of one or more nominees for each office to be filled. The Chairman shall send this ticket to each Branch three weeks prior to the Annual Meeting. In addition to the ticket presented by this Committee, any nominations indorsed by three Branches and with the consent of the nominees may then be made. Such nominations shall be sent to the Chairman of the Nominating Committee one week prior to the Annual Meeting and the Chairman shall inform the Annual Meeting of any such names. Nominations may be made from the floor of the Annual Meeting by any delegate, provided the consent of the nominees has been obtained.
 - D. The incoming President and the incoming Secretary of Christian Education, by virtue of their offices, shall be declared delegates one and two from the Diocese to the Triennial. A nominee from the Negro District, as representing the minority group in the Diocese, shall be elected delegate number three from the Diocese.
 - E. The Nominating Committee shall submit a ticket including the names of the incoming President, the incoming Secretary of Christian Education and the nominee from the Negro District, together with three other nominations for delegates and six nominations for alternates to the Triennial. The alternate for delegate number three shall be a member of the Negro District.
 - F. The ticket presented by the Nominating Committee for delegates to Provincial Auxiliary Meetings shall include a name from the Negro District as representing the minority group in the Diocese. An alternate for this delegate shall be named from the Negro District.
 - G. Nominations for both delegates and alternates may be made from the floor of the Annual Meeting.
 - H. The election of alternates shall follow the announcement of the results of the balloting on delegates.
5. When any office in the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina is declared vacant by the Executive Board, the acting Nominating Committee (being governed by Article VIII, Section I) shall present to the Executive Board a name or names to be elected by the said Board to fill the declared vacancy. Should

a vacancy occur in the office of President, the First Vice-President shall serve until the next Annual Meeting, at which time an election shall be held for the unexpired term.

6. The Diocesan President shall appoint at the beginning of her second year of office the following Chairmen, to serve for three years: Chairman of Church Periodical Club, Interracial Chairman, Legislative Chairman, Missionary Correspondent, Chairman of Young People's Work, Chairman of Personnel.

7. The District Officers shall correspond to the Diocesan Officers and shall be elected at the first meeting of the District after the Diocesan Annual Meeting.

The District Chairman shall appoint the following Chairmen to serve for three years: (1) Church Periodical Club, (2) Missionary Correspondent, (3) Young People's Work, (4) Personnel.

8. Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be the authority in all questions of parliamentary law not covered by these By-Laws.

9. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates of any Annual Meeting.

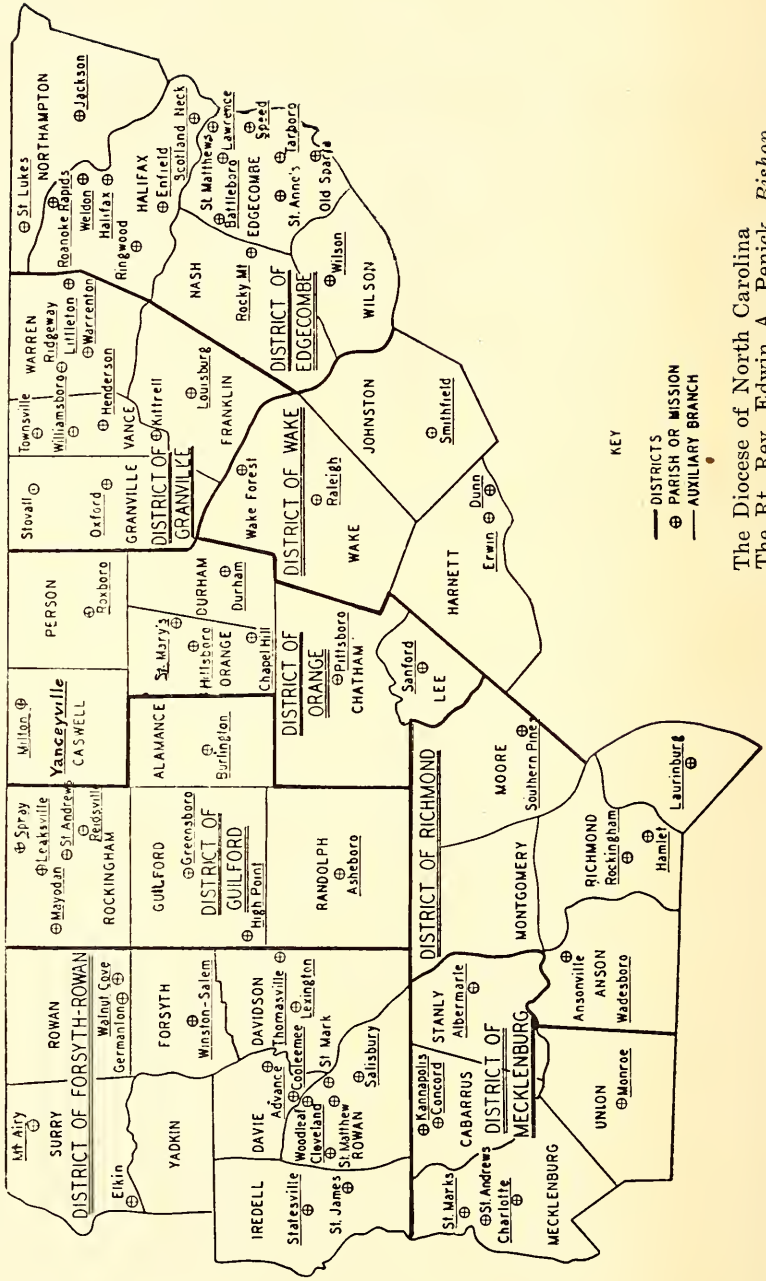

OBJECTIVES OF WOMAN'S AUXILIARY BRANCHES
YEAR 1951-52

God is faithful, by whom ye were called unto the fellowship of His Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.—I Cor. 1:9

WORSHIP: Ye are called to meet God in His Holy Temple.

1. Set aside part of each day for private meditation and prayers.
2. Have family prayers daily.
3. Observe at least four corporate Communion services during the year.
4. Observe Intercessory Days with a corporate Communion or Worship service.
January 6, Feast of Epiphany.
February 2, Feast of the Purification.
5. Have a presentation service for the United Thank Offering in Spring and Fall.
6. Attend the Quiet Day of Prayer and Meditation in your district, December 7, the first Friday in Advent.
7. Observe prayer days sponsored by United Council of Church Women (See Diocesan Calendar).
8. Plan devotions for your meetings so that they are an integral part of the program of the meeting.

STUDY: Ye are called unto the fellowship for truth-seekers.

1. Plan a program of study for the year in accordance with the recommendations of the Diocesan Secretary of Christian Education.
2. Plan each meeting to have every officer present current information concerning the work of her department in parish, community, diocese, nation or world.
3. Combat religious illiteracy by promoting classes to study the Bible, the Creed, the Sacraments and the Church.
4. Read and study the publications in "The Church's Teaching Series" singly and in groups.
5. Subscribe to and read *The N. C. Churchman, Churchways* and *Forth*.
6. Attend at least one summer conference.

SERVICE: Ye are called to be servants and friends of Jesus Christ.

1. Participate in campaigns for overseas relief.
2. Support the Thompson Orphanage and assigned missions with gifts and supplies.
3. Support such plans for Christian Social Service as are suggested by that department, particularly in the matter of Displaced Persons.
4. Respond to requests from Diocesan Supply Department.
5. Cooperate with local youth organizations.
6. Cooperate in local projects on behalf of the Armed Forces.

GIFTS: Ye are called to be good stewards.

1. Stress the spiritual significance of the U.T.O. and the presentations at meetings of information concerning its use in the mission field. Place an offering of at least one cent a day in the Blue Box.
2. Contribute funds for Camp Delaney, our diocesan camp for negroes.
3. Tithe! And influence others to do likewise.
4. Contribute to International Christian University in Japan.

5. Encourage the acceptance by your vestry of the full Church's Program Quota for your congregation.
6. Endeavor to increase your pledge in December to the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary budget of January 1—December 31, 1952 and pay your Woman's Auxiliary pledge promptly.

FELLOWSHIP: Ye are called unto companionship with Christ through the Church.

1. Re-awaken the interest of inactive members.
2. Recruit new members.
3. Sponsor the organization of new branches.
4. Promote at St. Mary's Episcopal Student Center, Greensboro, a program on organization and work of the Woman's Auxiliary.
5. Work more closely with the personnel secretary, seeking every opportunity to direct others into Church work as their life's work.
6. Strive for mutual strengthening of negro and white branches by closer cooperation in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary.
7. Aim for greater understanding between races, classes and creeds.
8. Bend every effort toward the achievement of unity on the local level, realizing that the Church is One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic.

ANALYSIS OF THE YEAR OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE DIOCESE

1. The fiscal year of the Diocese and the branches runs from January 1st to December 31st. Reason: It must coincide with the fiscal year of the National Council.
2. The year of active study and action runs from the first meeting in the Fall to the last meeting before Summer recess. Reason: It must conform to the plans and material sent out from the National Council.
3. New branch officers should be elected at a meeting prior to the Annual Diocesan Meeting. Reason: (a) The names of the new officers can then be listed in the new year book. (b) New officers should be considered in the election of delegates to the Annual Meeting.
4. The Annual Diocesan Meeting is usually held the second week after Easter, conforming to the date of the Diocesan convention of the Church and to the Bishop's schedule.
5. New branch officers should be installed at the last meeting before Summer recess. The new president presides at the first Fall Meeting. A few branches meet during the Summer. Their officers should be installed at the June meeting. The new president presides at the July meeting.
6. New officers should spend the summer preparing for the coming year of study and action. The program of Christian Education should be prepared at this time.
7. Report blanks are sent to all the branches in March. Reports cover the period of time from previous July 1st. to May 1st. Branch reports must be mailed to the District Chairman by April 25th. Lists of recently elected officers sent in on the reports then become correct in the year book for the longest period of the year possible.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

69TH ANNUAL MEETING—WOMAN'S AUXILIARY
St. Philip's Church, Durham, April 11, 1951

As your President, I welcome you to the 69th Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of North Carolina. It is a pleasure to see so many of you here, and it is my earnest hope that the two days ahead of us will prove to be of great value to us all.

The keynote for this meeting, "Increase in Us True Religion," was chosen because true religion encompasses all phases of our auxiliary work.

As the program unfolds before us and we hear detailed reports and plans of each department, I hope application of this theme will be the resolve of each individual present and that every one of us will use this prayer daily, taking home to our respective branches the wider and deeper meaning of these words.

During the past year our Auxiliary has grown in many ways-- numerically by about 500, the total membership now being, 4,503. We lost two branches but gained three, making 109 in the diocese. (I hope representatives of those three new ones are here today)— St. Michael's, Raleigh; St. John's, Henderson; Galloway Memorial, Elkin.

Our Treasurer will report on the budget and surplus but she won't know of the many extras and specials which were noted on the report blanks. A careful estimate of all the money given by the women—including your budgets, United Thank Offering, Supply, Intercessory day offerings, central fund, missionary gifts, your many local projects, such as a roof or a carpet or an organ for the church—reached the surprising amount of almost \$75,000. The widespread interest of the women, as evidenced by the recipients of these extras, is very gratifying and leads one to the belief that we are striving to obtain one of the objectives in our Constitution—that of the Extension of the Kingdom.

A study of the branch reports revealed the fact that more and more of our women are members of prayer groups and that a great many of you attend regular Bible classes. The members of many more branches celebrated the Holy Communion on our two intercessory days and at our United Thank Offering gatherings. About 300 of you participated in the Quiet Day of Prayer and Meditation in December which is a big increase over the previous years this day has been observed in each of our nine districts. However, 300 is a small percentage of 4,500. My fervent prayer is that at least twice as many of you will avail yourselves of this privilege next December.

Summer conferences were well attended. I'm sure you've all heard of the success of the Woman's Auxiliary Conference at Vade Mecum under the capable direction of Miss Eleanor Snyder, where there was capacity attendance of over eighty from 39 branches. The Adult Conference at Kanuga had enrolled seventeen women from this diocese and fifteen of us attended the Conference of Church Workers at St. Augustine's, Raleigh, last June. Dare I say that we are striving harder than ever toward the second objective in our Constitution, that of religious education? You'll hear more of that from Mrs. Jones in a little while.

Our third objective is that of Christian Social Service. Mrs. Walker will tell you of that part of our work, but let me say that over a third of our branches support from one to five children at the Thompson Orphanage. Later on in the program you will hear of a plan to increase our social service to those children.

I won't take the time to read again the resolutions adopted a year ago, and see how well we have carried them out, both in our personal lives and in our relationship with others. I trust each one of you will do so when you return home and add to those adopted in 1950 the new ones which will be voted on affirmatively tomorrow. Resolutions are only empty words if they are not followed by action.

I have one more request to make of each of you. Please inform yourselves about what is going on in our Church. The branch presidents can be of tremendous help in seeing that each of her members is given the pertinent content of the Church publications, both national and diocesan. Keep the flow of information going so that the interest of the "last woman in the last pew" is aroused, and aroused to the extent that she will act and that her true religion will be increased.

It was my happy privilege to be one of your representatives to the Provincial Meeting in Tampa last October. I spoke about this meeting to two districts and one branch, and have appeared before eight other branches during the year. I have attended a meeting of the Board of Managers of the Thompson Orphanage and a meeting of the Board of Directors of Kanuga; also the Diocesan Convention in Winston-Salem last May and four Executive Council meetings, at all of which I made a report of our Auxiliary; and, of course, there have been innumerable conferences with committees and individuals within the Diocese. Last, but not least, I had the rare opportunity of attending the Consecration of our Bishop-Coadjutor and the luncheon in his honor, at which time I presented to him a gift from the 4,503 women of the Diocese.

My message would not be complete without a recognition of the unflinching response and enthusiasm and invaluable aid I have received from my fellow officers—and, indeed, from all the women with whom I have come in contact. Your cheerful willingness to undertake any task which is assigned to you and your splendid cooperation with me and with each other have been an inspiration to me.

Let us pledge ourselves anew to obtaining the three objectives of our Church as stated in our Constitution, let us go forward together in the work of our Lord and Master as we pray reverently and sincerely that He increase in us true religion.

Mrs. Temple, Chairman of the Committee on Thompson Orphanage Gift Fund, gave the report of that Committee. Mrs. Temple moved that each Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese, exclusive of the Negro Branches, include in its budget annually a sum of money—not less than \$2 nor more than \$25—to constitute a fund from which a gift of \$100 shall be given to each Thompson Orphanage boy or girl upon his or her graduation from high school and simultaneously from the Orphanage. Cash in bank was confirmed by depository bank, and reconciled at December 31, 1950. The net amount of \$165.49, cash items in early January 1951, but applicable to December 1950, is included as cash transaction in the month of December 1950.

Cash in bank on January 1, 1950 amounted to \$3,302.88. Net cash receipts over disbursements amounted to \$472.16. Cash in bank on December 31, 1950 amounted to \$3,775.04. In addition to the amount of \$3,775.04, the Auxiliary had \$500.00 to their account in full paid shares in the Security Building and Loan Association, Durham, N. C., and \$453.77 in optional savings in the Security Building and Loan Association, Durham, N. C., making total assets of \$4,728.81, according to the Auxiliary records.

The amount of \$500.00 was confirmed by the Association; however, the Association reported \$497.87 instead of \$453.77 as indicated by the Auxiliary records. This may represent interest accrued on the books of the Association.

The Treasurer presented cancelled checks and bank statements to us for the period May 1, 1950 to December 31, 1950. Cancelled checks and bank statements for the period January 1, 1950 to April 30, 1950 were not inspected by us.

We found no exceptions to Mrs. J. P. Armstrong's cash records for the period examined by us.

- D. Have you included in final printed or mimeographed programs, such details as:
1. Program subjects and speakers.
 2. Time and place of meetings.
 3. List of committees.
 4. List of members.
 5. Message from Branch President—making her policy for the year clearer.
 6. Message from the Rector—keynoting the spirit of the year's work.

- E. Use these checks on the final program, before it is printed:
1. Has it something in it for all the women of the branch?
 2. Does it meet the parish's needs?
 3. Does it embody the purpose of the Woman's Auxiliary, outside, as well as inside the parish?

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

As I come to the close of a three year period of working for and with you in the field of Christian Social Relations, I would like to evaluate the program, pointing up that which has seemed good, yet not failing to point out places that have been weak so that your new secretary will not have to work by trial and error and may be able to start on the second rung of the ladder.

Our effort in the past three years has been largely educational. We found that the average branch needed to learn the immense scope of the work, and to learn just what activities can be labeled Christian Social Relations. We have had partial success, and as in any program of education, it must continue. It has been my pleasure to meet with eight of your branches and to attend seven district meetings where we discussed this program. Branches should keep in mind that your diocesan secretary is available to help you and should be used.

There are several hurdles which your secretary must overcome if the program is to accomplish that which it is designed to do. First, that the national program is largely educational, and if any specific project is launched, it is likely to reach us after our program is planned for the year. Secondly, that we have been unable to find a niche wherein to fit into the diocesan program. And thirdly, that the diocesan and branch auxiliaries sometimes lose sight of the fact that we have a well set up committee. Projects may come up during the year that can well come under Christian Social Relations, and a new committee is formed to carry out the project. Local welfare, requests from missionaries that do not come under Supply or Missionary Correspondent, special projects for Thompson Orphanage, or any effort toward a better understanding of race relations can well be referred to this committee which is ready and equipped to do the job and eager to be used.

The last hurdle is the fact that there is so much difference of opinion as to just what projects to support. The diocesan projects are selected with care and are either suggested or approved by the national secretary of this committee. If one of the projects does not have your hearty approval, a token contribution would not be too much of a sacrifice while it would help to strengthen the unity of the group and encourage the committee to greater effort.

We are over the hurdles, now to the pleasurable part of thanking you for your splendid cooperation. The plan of special projects seemed to be of particular interest to the smaller branches and it was there we had the greatest response. Incomplete reports show us that we have sent over 270 yards of material to Jerusalem valued at \$250 and 36 packages of supplies to nursery schools in Japan, plus contributions of \$31.

We are sending \$185.50 to the Tuttle Community Center in Raleigh. This will be used for playground equipment for the nursery school. They are setting up a special playground in the side yard to be used by the 50 small children who have been unable to use the playground with the larger children. We will furnish 2 combination swing sets (which include 2 swings, bars, and a see saw) and a slide. The balance of the fund will be used for cots needed for the rest period.

In closing, I wish to thank you for the honor of serving as your secretary. It has been a rare privilege to be engaged in furthering projects which emphasize the reality of the brotherhood of man, and the imprint of treasured friendships is something time can never erase.

To my successor, I will and bequeathe a work that will challenge her greatest effort and give the greatest rewards. My love and prayers will follow you as you continue to exemplify Christian love through your program of Christian Social Relations.

SUPPLY

The work of the Supply Department has been defined for you so often that I do not believe it requires another definition here. Even those of you, who are new in Auxiliary work, will find that you will have every opportunity to learn about it at an early date. For the work, which is being done within our Diocese and for Missions outside, requires the help and effort of every Auxiliary member.

The results of the year, now drawing to a close, speak loudly of the fact that almost every branch in the Diocese has had a larger share than ever before in the Supply work. This means their financial contributions as well as their time and efforts. Although this is not a statistical report, I believe that you will each one be interested in knowing that this year you have supplied to Saint Agnes Hospital, Raleigh and the Good Samaritan, Charlotte, approximately three thousand articles. These include sheets, pillow cases, towels, patients' gowns, Doctors' and hospital workers' scrub suits and dresses, infants' layettes, etc. The value of all of these, if purchased through stores and surgical supply houses, is quite staggering and far beyond the means of the hospitals themselves. But because of the many branches, who have done such a splendid job in sewing and of interested friends in the textile business, who have kindly let us purchase necessary materials at low prices, we have been able to fill every request made by the hospitals.

In addition to these two, we have also sent shipments to Saint Barnabas Hospital in Osaka, Japan, valued at \$250.00. This is a maternity hospital with a capacity for one hundred and twenty mothers. It is doing a fine work in that country, where Christianity is meeting its greatest challenge. This was our only assignment outside the Diocese.

Within the Diocese, the Tuttle Community Center and the Thompson Orphanage have received many boxes of excellent used clothing. I do not need to tell you what this latter contribution has meant to Mr. and Mrs. Whisnant and the girls and boys there. In these days of inflation and greatly increased prices, the money available could not possibly stretch sufficiently to buy all the clothes needed. More and more, you are depended on for your good outgrown and not outworn clothing to round out the eighty-five wardrobes of the Thompson Orphanage.

The used clothing, bedding, etc., which has been sent to the Tuttle Community Center, is helping in the fine type of settlement work done by that institution and is the only contribution made by the Episcopal Church to what was formerly entirely a Church project.

In December a check for \$35.00 was sent to the National Council for the Supply Secretary's Gift Fund. This fund is distributed at Christmas time to retired Missionaries, their widows and families, to help pad their meager pensions.

As I look back over the past two years, since we first undertook the responsibility of supplying the needs of our Diocese, without outside help, as well as those of Missions in the foreign field, I feel that we have come a long way and that each woman should feel proud of the part she has had in the success of this undertaking. Last year what was accomplished was fully three times greater than what was done the year before. This year it is ap-

proximately five times greater, both in monetary value and in number of articles supplied. We shall need to continue our greatest efforts financially and otherwise, if we are to maintain the standard we have set for ourselves as a Diocese. I have no doubt that we shall.

As my term of office ends, may I say "Thank You" to the members of my committee and each one of you for your unflinching help, your understanding and your friendship. I am deeply appreciative of the opportunity of working with you and having even a small share in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary.

When our women are alerted to the United Thank Offering our funds will be unlimited and only Our Father in Heaven will know the breadth and depth of our spiritual growth. We must work always toward giving every woman the joy and privilege of being a part of the United Thank Offering. Giving not just of her abundance but of self denial.

If each one of us would pledge to give at least one Box to some one this Spring or Summer our "Offering with Power" would go up at least a fourth. I am reversing my decision in regard to carrying supplies. There have been some expressions of interest in knowing where our Offering goes, this I have tried to stimulate in my talks. There is a dollar growth in some Parishes and I trust this means greater participation.

DIOCESAN FIELD WORKER

There are only a few Negro clergy to serve the entire diocese, and their work must cover many groups in widely scattered areas. This gives them a limited time to train our leaders, so this has, in all parishes and missions, been of first importance. Our leaders are not always able to take advantage of the privilege of attending such meetings as our district meetings and the Annual Meeting of the diocese, to obtain instruction and inspiration for their various duties in Auxiliary activities, so the Field Worker makes every effort to keep informed in order to be of service where she is needed.

The work among our Young People has been stressed in every parish and mission. Leaders are given every possible assistance in their efforts to carry out carefully planned programs to interest and inspire the youth of our church, and this work is being strengthened by the program of work carried on by Camp Delaney.

Camp Delaney is our District Project, and working together as a group for the improvement of this splendid source of youth training and recreation, has been a great opportunity for us to learn more fully of the important place it can become in the church life of our people. Our young people have less than average privileges for training in Christian leadership, so we must constantly strive to make Camp Delaney attractive and to make full use of its possibilities.

Our records show no spectacular growth or improvement in any one field of service, but we believe a sympathetic as well as a comparative study of our records and reports will show a healthy and very encouraging growth in interest, action, and the devotional life of our branches.

As your Field Worker and representative, I have been privileged to go into every parish and mission and to give help in any way possible. This has been done, first, by availing myself of the unusual opportunities given me by the National Church and the diocese to improve my own training and quality of leadership. The weeks of study at Windham House and Union Theological Seminary have been of inestimable benefit to me personally. The training has given me the confidence and encouragement that I sorely needed, and the fellowship and opportunities served to strengthen my faith and to give me a clearer vision to serve my people. Second, the ministers of our churches have cooperated in every way and

have invited me to come to their parishes and have a part in making the best use of what we have in the way of equipment and in planning future activities and program. Then, the diocesan leaders have been generous and untiringly patient in their efforts to give our leaders help in filling to the best of their ability their offices in Auxiliary work. Then, last and most important, our women themselves are constantly striving to learn more about the Woman's Auxiliary, its unlimited fields of service, and, in learning, have come to feel a deeper sense of their responsibility to go forward with the Church at large in study, action, and in a spiritual growth that will truly bear fruit now and in the future.

PERSONNEL

The Objectives of the Department of Personnel are:

1. To make known the urgent need of the Church for women workers trained to be Directors of Religious Education, College Workers, Parish Secretaries, Social Workers, Teachers and Nurses.
2. To make available the necessary training for young women who are interested in entering these fields of service, and obtaining scholarships for them when necessary.
3. To assist in placing these young women where they are most needed and best suited after they have received their training.
4. To keep in touch with our women workers in the field at home and abroad.

There is a great opportunity for young women of high personal and religious qualifications to find a career of service in our Church. As the needs of the Church become better known there will be an increase in the number of applicants for pioneering jobs of this kind. For this reason, the Personnel Secretaries of each branch are urged:

1. To get information about opportunities awaiting trained young people of the parish.
2. To select the most outstanding young person in the parish who has qualifications of leadership, an attractive and well-balanced personality and be sure she is aware of the possibilities for a career within our Church.

1. Tell us about Personnel.
2. Consider the Church.
3. We work for the Church.
4. The Church: A Profession for Women.

It is most gratifying to know there are at least two college graduates from the Diocese of North Carolina who expect to enter Windham House, New York City; or, St. Mary's House, Philadelphia in the fall to receive training for Church work.

Each member of the Woman's Auxiliary should consider it her individual responsibility to create interest in this program through personal contact with the young people of her parish.

YOUTH WORK

During the past year several additional branches have appointed Youth Work Secretaries, and reports from all the branches show a growing interest in the work. A workshop on Youth Work was held at Vade Mecum last summer, and from the findings of this workshop a booklet "A Handbook for Youth Work Secretaries" was compiled. Copies of this booklet were sent each branch secretary. Included in the handbook are duties of Youth Work Secretaries, which are as follows:

1. Keep your Auxiliary informed of the activities and needs of the youth.
2. Keep your Parish informed of the needs and activities of the youth.
3. Cooperate with the Rector, Sunday School, and other organizations in procuring adult leadership.
 - (a) While the Youth Work Secretary is primarily concerned with the age group twelve through the teens, in many small parishes there are few young people of this group, so her activity and interest may certainly cover the cradle roll, Sunday School, Brownie Scouts, Cub Scouts, Junior Choirs, etc.
4. Study the needs of the youth in your parish and try to interest the parish in providing the means to fill them.
5. Subscribe to Youth Leaders Mailing List,—281 Fourth Ave., New York 10, N. Y.—cost \$1.00.
6. Urge observance of special communions for youth, as designated by the National Council.
7. Investigate possibility of interesting the Youth of your parish in one or more of the Youth Organizations, such as Girl's Friendly; Order of the Daughters of the King, Jr. Division; Order of Sir Galahad; Brotherhood of St. Andrews, Jr. Division.
8. Make the Youth feel that they are an important part of Parish life, and encourage them to participate in activities. See that they are given definite jobs to do—some in cooperation with adults and some on their own.
9. Work constantly to emphasize the importance of the parish's cooperation with the youth by supporting their projects. Too often only parents are aware or interested, and young people are hurt by the fact that the parish as a whole does not care.
10. Interest the parish and the Auxiliary in giving scholarships to the Youth Conference, Y. P. S. L. Convention, and to the camps at Vade Mecum and Camp Delaney.
11. The Secretary is not necessarily required to act in the capacity of advisor or leader to the youth groups, unless she has the talent, and is requested by the Rector or organization.

MISSIONARY CORRESPONDENT

First I wish to express my appreciation for the high privilege and honor of serving this Diocese as Missionary Correspondent. Also, I desire to thank the Missionary Correspondents of the Districts and Parishes for their fine spirit of cooperation.

We are also grateful to our missionaries for the interesting letters and pictures they have been so thoughtful to send us. Your Missionary Correspondent has released the monthly bulletins and hopes that these have been inspirational and helpful. It is hoped that those Parishes which contribute so generously to the various projects and enterprises will report these activities to the Missionary Correspondent or to our Treasurer, so that they will receive proper credit.

The Church has a definite missionary program which it has had since the infant Church of the Upper Room with Jesus and His Disciples. Each of us is, or should be, a Missionary Beacon Light and a part of Christ's Holy Fellowship.

We are living in a changed and changing world. A chaotic, confused world, which offers a new imperative to all Christian people, especially to our own country, to spread the doctrine of Christianity as our first line of defense. We must carry the torch of Christianity and spread the Gospel if civilization is to survive. We must accept our responsibilities and obligations to send missionaries to the foreign fields and to our United States. Religion and Christian Faith are the only panaceas for the war-weary world.

We must, therefore, evaluate our service, purge ourselves of injustices and un-Christian attitudes in order to create a world vision. We do realize that kindness and friendship are the very essence of the human equation.

We know full well that any church or any auxiliary is dying, which is not missionary minded. REPORT OF THE REPRESENTATIVE ON THE STATE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina is one of the sixteen state organizations having membership in the State Legislature Council. The Council was organized in North Carolina in 1920 by five women's organizations. In 1934 membership was expanded to include representatives of statewide organizations, with both women and men included in the membership. In 1941 the Council became the fifteenth State Council to join the National Council on State Legislation.

The State Legislative Council has a two-fold purpose: (1) to propose new social legislation, and (2) to safeguard worthwhile legislation already enacted. Each member agency appoints one representative to a Study Committee, which was organized in 1948. This committee works for two years studying the need for proposed legislation. After particular needs have been defined they are presented to the total membership of all organizations. If unanimously approved by all member agencies, the State Legislative Council becomes responsible for sponsoring the passage of specific legislation.

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina has four representatives on the State Legislative Council. They are: Mrs. T. C. Powell, Jr., Raleigh; Mrs. James Beckwith, Warrenton; The Rev. I. Harding Hughes, Raleigh, who is a member representing the N. C. Churchman, which will attempt to publicize to the women in the Diocese the program of the Council, and Mrs. John Richardson, official representative.

During the legislative year of 1951 the State Legislative Council adopted a five point program. It consisted of: 1. Effective system with adequate support for improving enforcement of compulsory school attendance law. (This involved not a bill but a request for additional funds to enforce the compulsory school attendance law. The State Board of Education made such a request of the Advisory Budget Commission, but the Commission did not include it in its recommendations.) 2. Minimum wage and maximum hour standards for women and minors. 3. Provisions that in divorce proceedings where children under 18 years of age are involved, a definite plan for their care and custody be included in the order of the judge hearing the case. 4. Abolish the fee system in lieu of salary for operation of jails and for enforcement of the criminal laws. 5. Increase the jurisdiction of the juvenile court so as to include children 16 years of age.

None of the five proposed bills passed the General Assembly. The Legislative Council feels however, that a good educational job has been done on the subject of these bills.

I would like to report at this time on the action which has been taken by the legislative representatives on the Council in regard to Resolution IX which was adopted at the Annual Meeting in High Point last year. This resolution deals with the problem of degrading periodicals which are available to the youth of our State. The legislative representatives were asked by the Auxiliary to do something about this problem insofar as they could. The problem was referred to the Study Committee of the State Legislative Council which in turn referred it to the Library Division of the Council. The attached report is a result of their study.

It has been a great pleasure to serve as the official representative of the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese on the State Legislative Council. On behalf of the other three members and myself I wish to thank you for the privilege and honor.

From: *Committee Investigating Reading Materials in News Stands, Etc.*

Subject: Report of Findings

The committee recognizes the existence of a very real problem in the matter of reading material available in news stands and other commercial places. It is its unanimous opinion, however, that legislative action is not the solution for this problem.

1. In our country, laws are not merely for the present situation, but set patterns for the future, and a law censoring reading material could become a dangerous precedent.
2. Further, past experience indicates that prohibitive legislation will not alleviate the present undesirable situation.

The committee does not wish to give a merely negative report and therefore offers the following suggestions:

1. That each organization represented in the State Legislative Council of North Carolina become informed about efforts now being made by publishers such as the Association of Comics Magazine Publishers, and pledge its support of their program of improving the quality of their publications.
2. That local groups secure the cooperation of local dealers in making more careful selection of reading materials.
3. That individuals and organizations show their appreciation of this cooperation through their patronage of such dealers.
4. That fundamentally the primary responsibility upon parents, teachers, librarians, and others interested in the problem is that of instilling in children, from babyhood, a taste for reading that will develop a sense of values and discernment that will reject the shoddy and the cheap.

**RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED AT THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY
ANNUAL MEETING****St. Philip's Church, Durham, April 11-12**

Whereas: There will be an increasing number of young people in the Armed Forces stationed in our Diocese be it

Resolved: That each individual branch of the Woman's Auxiliary cooperate with all organized effort for service among the Armed forces.

The Committee recommends that the above resolution, if adopted, be incorporated in the delegates' reports to their branches.

The Committee further recommends that the two following resolutions already adopted by the National Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary be incorporated in the delegates' reports to their branches and that they be included in the annual report of this conference as resolutions two and three:

Resolved: That we respectfully urge the congress to take action to make available to the Government of India two million (2,000,000) tons of wheat upon mutually agreeable terms, and call upon the appropriate executive agencies to bend every effort to effect transportation of it in time to prevent widespread famine in the stricken land; and be it further

Resolved: That we would deplore any attempt on the part of the Congress to modify the Federal law which provides a minimum age of sixteen years for work on commercial farms during school hours.

Resolved: That this annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary hereby records with gratification and pride the national recognition that the Rector of this parish, The Rev. Clarence R. Haden, Jr., has received in being appointed to the Chairmanship of the Presiding Bishop's Committee on Laymen's Work. We sincerely regret his removal from this Diocese to assume his duties on a nationwide scale and wish for him abundant success in his new and responsible office.

SECTION V

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be, "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

ARTICLE II

Object

The object of this organization shall be to help in carrying out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church: Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service.

ARTICLE III

Membership

The membership of this organization shall be composed of all Parish and Mission Branches within the Diocese.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: A President, a First Vice-President, a Second Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of Christian Education, a Secretary of Christian Social Relations, a Secretary of Supply, a Secretary of Personnel, a Custodian of United Thank Offering.

Section 2. These officers with the District Chairmen, members of the Executive Council and Chairmen of Standing Committees shall constitute the Executive Board and shall meet at least twice a year at the call of the President.

ARTICLE V

Duties of Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for. She shall also preside at meetings, and at every Annual Meeting shall address the Auxiliary. She shall make a report to the Diocesan Convention.

Section 2. The First Vice-President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have specific duties to be decided in conference with the President.

Section 3. The Second Vice-President shall edit the Annual Report and Handbook of Information of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of North Carolina.

Section 4. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist other officers in preparing and having printed the Annual Report and at each Annual Meeting shall make a report.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering, and shall make a report of same to the Annual Meeting. At the end of every fiscal year the Treas-

urer's accounts shall be verified by a public auditor. The Treasurer's report, as audited, shall be published in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Section 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Education shall promote and stimulate educational work in the branches of the Diocese by every means in her power, and carry out the program of the National Department of Religious Education.

Section 7. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Relations shall co-operate with the Christian Social Relations Departments of the Diocese and the National Council, in the promotion of their plans and programs.

Section 8. The Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in the Spring and Fall of each year, and shall remit immediately for investment to the Treasurer of the National Council.

Section 9. The Secretary of Supply shall have charge of the work of the Supply Department.

Section 10. The Secretary of Personnel shall cooperate with the Personnel Departments of the branches and districts in the Diocese and of the National Council in efforts to promote the selection of church work as a vocation by young people and others.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. All Diocesan officers shall be elected for a term of three years. The Treasurer, the United Thank Offering Custodian, and the Secretary of Personnel to be elected at the first annual meeting after the Triennial: the President, Secretary of Supply and Secretary of Christian Social Relations to be elected at the second annual meeting after the Triennial: the President to take office at the third annual meeting after the Triennial: Vice Presidents and Secretary of Christian Education to be elected at the third meeting after the Triennial.

Section 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President.

ARTICLE VII

Districts

Section 1. For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into districts.

Section 2. A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman duly elected by her District for a term of three years. In case of vacancy the Vice-Chairman shall serve as Chairman.

Section 3. Each District shall hold at least one and, if possible, two meetings a year.

ARTICLE VIII

Election of Diocesan Officers

Section 1. Prior to the Annual Meeting, the President shall appoint from the Executive Board a nominating committee of three who shall consider proposed nominees to fill the elective offices at the Meeting, and from the names suggested or considered the Committee shall recommend to the Meeting the nominees for such offices. The consent of the nominees shall be obtained by the Com-

mittee before making the recommendation. Nominations may be made from the floor of the Meeting by any delegate provided the consent of the nominee has been first obtained. A majority vote shall be required for all elections. In case there are more than two nominees for the same office and no candidate receives a majority vote, the name receiving the smallest number of votes shall be dropped from the ballot.

Section 2. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund for Calendar Year preceding the meeting.

ARTICLE IX

Finance

The Executive Committee in consultation with the Bishop shall prepare a budget for the year. The budget shall be presented to the branches for their support at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Section 2. From the total amount pledged towards the budget, one-half shall apply to the work of the National Council, one-half to the work of the Diocese.

Section 3. The United Thank Offering and contributions for the Supply Department shall be in addition to the payments on the budget.

ARTICLE X

Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present, provided a written copy of the proposed amendments has been filed with the Diocesan Secretary, and a notice of same mailed to each branch by the Secretary at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting.

BY-LAWS

The place and time of the Annual Meeting shall be approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

1. The order of Business for the Annual Meeting shall be arranged by the President and the Executive Committee.

2. Each Parish Branch having fifty members or less shall be represented by the Branch President and one other delegate (appointed by the President or elected by the Branch). The President, or her representative, and the delegates each has a vote. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the Branch to an additional delegate with power to vote. The Diocesan Officers, District Chairmen, and the Chairmen of Standing Committees shall be empowered to vote on all business and election of officers.

3. Each Branch shall be assessed twenty-five cents per member to provide for Provisional Expenses, printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of Speakers, and other items necessary for the proper administration of this organization. This shall be known as the Central Fund.

4. One fourth of the Branches having the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at the Annual Meeting. Five members shall constitute a quorum at the Executive Committee Meetings.

- A. At the Fall District Meetings, all Branches are requested to submit names for consideration by the Diocesan Nominating Committee for officers to be elected at the following Annual Meeting. It is the privilege of the Branches to submit names from any Branch in the Diocese without the consent of the persons named. The Chairman of each District shall send to the Chairman of the Diocesan Nominating Committee all names submitted at her District Meeting.
 - B. It shall be the privilege of Branches and individual members to submit to the Chairman of the Nominating Committee names for consideration for officers to be elected. These names may be submitted at any time previous to six weeks before the Annual Meeting.
 - C. The Nominating Committee shall present a ticket of one or more nominees for each office to be filled. The Chairman shall send this ticket to each Branch three weeks prior to the Annual Meeting. In addition to the ticket presented by this Committee, any nominations indorsed by three Branches and with the consent of the nominees may then be made. Such nominations shall be sent to the Chairman of the Nominating Committee one week prior to the Annual Meeting and the Chairman shall inform the Annual Meeting of any such names. Nominations may be made from the floor of the Annual Meeting by any delegate, provided the consent of the nominees has been obtained.
 - D. The incoming President and the incoming Secretary of Christian Education, by virtue of their offices, shall be declared delegates one and two from the Diocese to the Triennial. A nominee from the Negro District, as representing the minority group in the Diocese, shall be elected delegate number three from the Diocese.
 - E. The Nominating Committee shall submit a ticket including the names of the incoming President, the incoming Secretary of Christian Education and the nominee from the Negro District, together with three other nominations for delegates and six nominations for alternates to the Triennial. The alternate for delegate number three shall be a member of the Negro District.
 - F. The ticket presented by the Nominating Committee for delegates to Provincial Auxiliary Meetings shall include a name from the Negro District as representing the minority group in the Diocese. An alternate for this delegate shall be named from the Negro District.
 - G. Nominations for both delegates and alternates may be made from the floor of the Annual Meeting.
 - H. The election of alternates shall follow the announcement of the results of the balloting on delegates.
5. When any office in the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina is declared vacant by the Executive Board, the acting Nominating Committee (being governed by Article VIII, Section I) shall present to the Executive Board a name or names to be elected by the said Board to fill the declared vacancy. Should a vacancy occur in the office of President, the First Vice-President shall serve until the next Annual Meeting, at which time an election shall be held for the unexpired term.

6. The Diocesan President shall appoint at the beginning of her second year in office the following Chairmen to serve for three years: Chairman of Young People's Work, Interracial Chairman, Missionary Correspondent, Director of Church Periodical Club and Chairman of Legislative Committee and Representative on the North Carolina Legislative Council.

7. The District Officers shall correspond to the Diocesan Officers and shall be elected at the first meeting of the District after the Diocesan Annual Meeting.

The District Chairman shall appoint the following Chairmen to serve for three years: (1) Church Periodical Club, (2) Missionary Correspondent, (3) Young People's Work.

8. Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be the authority in all questions of parliamentary law not covered by these By-Laws.

9. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates of any Annual Meeting.

OBJECTIVES OF WOMAN'S AUXILIARY BRANCHES YEAR 1952-53

"Create and make new our hearts and minds."—Theme of Triennial Meeting, 1952.

When we offer this prayer to God, let us open our hearts to His Indwelling Spirit, our minds to a wider and deeper knowledge of His Truth, our hands in willing service for Him to all His children at home and in the uttermost parts of the earth.

Let us open our hearts to Him through

WORSHIP:

1. As individuals, through daily prayer and private meditation, attendance at church services, especially the celebration of the Holy Communion, prayerful use of the United Thank Offering Blue Box.
2. As family groups, through grace at meals, family prayers, going together to church.
3. As Auxiliary branches, by observing Corporate Communion, or worship services on:
 - Jan. 6—Feast of the Epiphany.
 - Feb. 2—Feast of the Purification.
 - Mar. 25—Feast of the Annunciation and the Spring Ingathering of the United Thank Offering.
 - Oct. 18—St. Luke's Day and the Fall Ingathering of the United Thank Offering.

By attending the Quiet Day in your District on Dec. 5th, first Friday in Advent.

By participating in the World Day of Prayer on Feb. 20th, and other prayer days sponsored by the United Council of Church Women.

By forming prayer groups.

By planning devotions for all our meetings as carefully as we plan the program and as an integral part of the program.

By praying for our missionaries, for those from our parishes away at school and college, for those in the Armed Forces, for peace, for wisdom at the time of elections. (See Resolutions, page 64).

Let us open our minds to Him through

STUDY:

1. Organize Bible classes, and groups to study the books in the Church's Teaching Series.
2. Plan a program of study in accordance with the recommendations of our Diocesan and District Secretaries of Christian Education.
3. Share programs and speakers on the mission study topics—Africa, and Human Rights—with other church groups in our community, when possible.
4. Cooperate with other groups in our community in studying legislation, civil defense, local youth problems.
5. Read at least one general church paper—for example, The Living Church or Episcopal Church News—and Forth, the N. C. Churchman, and Churchways. Follow closely the reports on General Convention. Know the program of the Church, for we are Auxiliary to the whole program of the Church.

6. Have brief reports on each department of Auxiliary work at each meeting, and a program on each department at least once during the next Triennium.
7. Be informed on the opportunities for young people to find a life work in working for the Church.

Let us open our hands in service and gifts:

SERVICE:

1. In the parish by helping in the Church School, with Youth work, with college students, by visiting the sick and shut-in, by serving on the Altar Guild.
2. In the community by assisting in projects developing out of study of community needs.
3. In the diocese by supporting the Thompson Orphanage and other diocesan institutions and missions.
4. In the nation by supporting missions as requested by the Supply Department, and by exercising our responsibility as citizens to vote at election time.
5. In the world by participating in campaigns for overseas relief, and in assistance to Displaced Persons.
6. By developing leadership in the different paths of service. The Woman's Auxiliary and the Church need leaders.

GIFTS:

1. Strive to see that every woman owns and uses a United Thank Offering Blue Box.
 2. See that our branch pays its pledge to the budget of the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary—and increase it if we can.
 3. Encourage acceptance by our vestries of the full Church Program quota for our congregation.
 4. Make tithing our objective—5% for the Church, 5% for other charitable causes. Episcopalians averaged 5 cents a week per communicant to the work of the National Church last year. Let us give more in proportion to our means.
 5. Be alert to respond to special calls from our Church at home and overseas.
- Let us open our hearts to all our brothers in Christ, including those whom we do not like.

FELLOWSHIP:

1. Have a spirit of friendliness in church. (See Resolution I, page....)
2. Seek out inactive members, newcomers, the unchurched. Many are hungry for what our Church offers—let us not withhold it from them because of exclusiveness or timidity.
3. Keep in touch with the young people from our congregation who are in college or in the Armed Forces. Draw them back into the fellowship whenever they come home.
4. Practice and teach greater understanding of, and cooperation with, all races, classes and creeds, always remembering the Church is One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic.

ANALYSIS OF THE YEAR OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE DIOCESE

1. The fiscal year of the Diocese and the branches runs from January 1st to December 31st. Reason: It must coincide with the fiscal year of the National Council.

2. The year of active study and action runs from the first meeting in the Fall to the last meeting before Summer recess. Reason: It must conform to the plans and material sent out from the National Council.
3. New branch officers should be elected at a meeting prior to the Annual Diocesan Meeting. Reason: (a) The names of the new officers can then be listed in the new year book. (b) New officers should be considered in the election of delegates to the Annual Meeting.
4. The Annual Diocesan Meeting is usually held the second week after Easter, conforming to the date of the Diocesan convention of the Church and to the Bishop's schedule.
5. New branch officers should be installed at the last meeting before Summer recess. The new president presides at the first Fall Meeting. A few branches meet during the Summer. Their officers should be installed at the June meeting. The new president presides at the July meeting.
6. New officers should spend the summer preparing for the coming year of study and action. The program of Christian Education should be prepared at this time.
7. Report blanks are sent to all the branches in March. Reports cover the period of time from previous July 1st to May 1st. Branch reports must be mailed to the District Chairman by April 25th. Lists of recently elected officers sent in on the reports then become correct in the year book for the longest period of the year possible.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

70TH ANNUAL MEETING—WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

Church of the Good Shepherd, Rocky Mount, April 23, 1952

As your President, I welcome you to the 70th Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of North Carolina. It is a pleasure to see so many of you here, and it is my earnest prayer that the two days ahead of us will prove of great value to us all.

The keynote for this meeting is "Sharing in Redemption." As the program unfolds before us, and we hear detailed reports and goals of each department, let us realize that we must do our part in this great plan of Redemption, so that our efforts in all phases of Auxiliary life will be blessed.

The Auxiliary has been blessed during the past year in many ways. Numerically, there has been an increase of about 300, making a total membership of 4,835. The number of branches has decreased, but only because, in several places, organizations in the same church have combined, thus adopting the recommended unified plan, and thereby strengthening the parishes involved. And we have three new branches, those of St. Timothy's, Winston-Salem, Church of the Holy Family in Chapel Hill and our baby branch, St. Matthew's in Mooresville.

Our Treasurer will report later on the budget and surplus, but her report doesn't show the many extras and specials which did not go through her books. A conservative estimate of all the money given by you, including budget, United Thank Offering, supply, intercessory day offerings, central fund, missionary gifts, the many local projects such as a roof or an organ or a rug, reached the amazing amount of over \$85,000.

Even more gratifying than the total is your wide-spread interests, as evidenced by the variety of recipients of these funds.

It is thus obvious that in this way we are striving toward one of the objectives in our constitution: that of the Extension of Our Kingdom.

Spiritually, too, we are renewing and revitalizing our efforts towards that objective. There has been a noticeable growth in the spiritual attitude throughout the diocese. Many more of you are active participants in prayer groups, and are attending regular Bible classes. The reports of the Quiet Day of Prayer and Meditation held in each of the nine districts the first Friday in Advent show a definite turning toward things of the spirit. This is evidenced also in the number of branches observing the corporate communions on our two Intercessory Days, and at our United Thank Offering ingatherings.

Another outstanding example of the spiritual interest manifested throughout the diocese is the fact that the District of Mecklenburg brought the Rev. and Mrs. Edgar L. Sanford to Charlotte last month for a Healing Mission. The churches were filled to capacity at every service, and both Mr. and Mrs. Sanford were busy every day having personal interviews with sick and troubled people, many of whom came from other parts of the diocese.

The conference at Vade Mecum was successful from every standpoint. There was capacity attendance, an excellent faculty, and an overflow on Visitor's Day. Results can readily be seen in many departments, particularly in the branches whose members were present for the entire time.

There were twenty members of our diocese in attendance at the Adult Conference at Kanuga, six at the Lay Conference on Christian Education at Sewanee, and sixteen at the Conference of Church Workers at St. Augustine's College, Raleigh, last summer. Programs in the branches have been greatly improved and enthusiasm aroused in Religious Education. I'm sure we are striving harder than ever—and more successfully—toward the second objective of our constitution: that of Christian Education.

In that connection let me stress again the importance of keeping up—not with the Joneses—but with the activities of our Church. Please subscribe to, and then read, our Church publications. For the next few months they will be full of plans for the General Convention and the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to be held in Boston in September. Thrilling and inspiring events will take place then, and the next best thing to being present is reading about them. So see that you and your members back home are informed, and therefore actively interested, in our Church and all phases of its endeavors. The branch presidents can be of tremendous help in keeping the channel of information open, and in giving the pertinent content of our Church publications to their members.

The third objective of our constitution is that of Christian Social Service. Mrs. Purser will tell you of that part of our work, but let me anticipate her report—and possibly steal some of her thunder—by telling you that more than one-third of the branches support from one to eight children at the Thompson Orphanage. And when the appeal was made just a year ago for \$400 to enable each June graduate at the Orphanage to leave the fold with \$100 in his pocket, you gave more than double that sum.

Time forbids a mention of our many other departments. You will hear from each officer and committee chairman during the day. However, I do want you to know that the Diocesan Auxiliary was represented in Atlanta last November by Mrs. Matt Wall at the Southeastern Convocation of United Council of Churches of Christ in the U. S. A., and that many of you have participated locally in the ecumenical observance of World Fellowship Day, World Community Day and World Day of Prayer.

It was my happy privilege to be one of your representatives to the Provincial Synod in Birmingham last October. During the year I have spoken at two district meetings and to several branches, and have attended a meeting of the Board of Managers of Thompson Orphanage. I was present at the Diocesan Convention in Greensboro last May, and at three meetings of the Diocesan Executive Council, at each of which I made a report for the Auxiliary. I have met with the Diocesan Department of Christian Education, and that of Missions, and, of course, there have been many committee meetings and numerous conferences with individuals in the Diocese.

My message would not be complete without a recognition of the unfailing response and enthusiasm and invaluable aid I have received from my fellow officers—and, indeed, from all of you with whom I have come in contact. Your cheerful willingness to under-

take any task which is assigned to you, and your splendid co-operation with me, and with each other, have been an inspiration to me.

Let us pledge ourselves anew to continue to strive for the three objectives of our Church as stated in our constitution: namely, Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education and Christian Social Service. Let us go forward together in the work of our Lord and Master as we pray fervently that we do our part in "Sharing in Redemption."

Holmes, Jr., incoming President, along with Mrs. Winkler's name will be presented to the Diocesan Convention as selections to serve on the Diocesan Executive Council, Mrs. Holmes to serve three years by virtue of her office.

one and two respectively. She declared the nominee from the minority group delegate number three.

Mrs. Lucas reported for Mrs. E. G. Peoples, President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Province of Sewanee, who was absent. She read from Mrs. Peoples' newsletter regarding the program for the Sewanee Summer Conference.

It was moved, seconded and carried telegrams be sent to Mrs. Peoples, the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of East Carolina, presently in Annual Meeting, and Miss Emma Joy Hall.

Mrs. F. O. Clarkson, Representative on the National Executive Board, reported on happenings at the recent Executive meeting and of the plans and program of the Triennial Meeting. She told of the part the Woman's Auxiliary has in the General Convention.

The delegates were extended an invitation to go on a tour of Rocky Mount gardens and the meeting was recessed until 8 p.m.

At the evening service Bishop Penick was assisted by The Rev. Mr. Temple and the speaker was The Rt. Rev. J. I. Blair Larned, D.D., Bishop In Charge of the American Protestant Episcopal Churches in Europe.

At 7:30 a.m., April 24, there was a celebration of the Holy Communion with Bishop Penick as the celebrant, assisted by Bishop

Baker, The Rev. Mr. Temple and Deacon John M. Barr. At this service there was the presentation of the United Thank Offering and a commemoration of the departed by the use of the Auxiliary Roll of Remembrance.

At 10 a.m. the meeting reconvened with a hymn and opening prayers led by The Rev. Thomas A. Fraser, rector of St. Paul's Church, Winston-Salem.

The President thanked the organist and choir director and Mrs. Gray Temple for furnishing music for the meeting.

After the singing of a hymn Bishop Penick introduced Mrs. Arthur M. Sherman, Executive Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, who spoke on "Partners in World Missions of the Church."

Mrs. Armstrong presented the Executive Board's recommendations for the allocation of a \$1,922.21 surplus from 1951. Mrs. Walter Bade, member of the Resolutions Committee, presented the report of the Committee and moved that each of the five resolutions be adopted. Motions to adopt the five resolutions were duly seconded and resolutions adopted.

Mrs. G. E. Gauss, Chairman, read the report of the Courtesy and Findings Committee. There being no objection, the report was accepted.

Mrs. P. B. Smith instituted a rising vote of thanks to Bishop Baker for his assistance to the Quiet Day of Prayer and Meditation.

Mrs. J. W. Swearingen, Charlotte, extended an invitation for the 1953 Annual Meeting to be held at St. Martin's Church, Charlotte. The President announced the Executive Board had voted to accept the invitation.

There was a motion to dispense with the reading of the minutes. It was seconded and carried.

Mrs. Lucas relinquished the chair to Mrs. U. T. Holmes, Jr., incoming President, who announced the Secretary will be Miss Louise Hall of Chapel Hill.

It was moved that the meeting be adjourned after installation of officers. It was seconded and carried, after which Bishop Penick addressed the meeting and installed the following newly elected officers: Mrs. U. T. Holmes, Jr., President; Mrs. Edwin F. Lucas, First Vice President; Mrs. Matt Wall, Second Vice President; Mrs. Angus M. McBryde, Secretary Christian Education.

Bishop Penick pronounced the benediction.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Appended to these brief paragraphs is a working outline, planned for new Secretaries of Christian Education. I should like to add a short message to those Secretaries. First, though she may have been told by the importunate Chairman of the Nominating Committee that her new job would be "just planning the program" she will soon find out, if she is conscientious, that it is infinitely more than that. Once she is acquainted with the materials for just that she will be drawn into the planning of most of the other Departments to provide a really broad program. That is as it should be. Outside her own Department such contributions might well be in suggestions of methods and techniques, rather than in content. Increasing knowledge of the resource material of National Council will give her a widening sense of the infinite possibilities of audio-visual education in all departments. Interdepartmental planning is essential to a well-rounded Woman's Auxiliary endeavor.

In the second place, I am convinced that the new Secretary of Christian Education is often late in sensing the help she has in our Church's publications, particularly *Churchways*, for practical program ideas, and *Forth* for stimulus to the missionary interest. To miss these magazines would be almost as deplorable as to fail to work constantly for the parish-wide use of The Church's Teaching Series publications.

In the third place, the new Secretary of Christian Education will find out early in her career that not only in National Council offering far and wide, a wealth of material, but it is sending travelling teams of skilled interpreters of that material to places where their help is asked. A Secretary who works for the coming of such teams to her parish and her Diocese is deepening the influence of her Department.

These few points are less than a minimum for lack of space. Because there is such opportunity for service in the Department, and because its resources are so rich and varied I should like to venture the suggestion that wherever possible the Secretary of this Department might well be prevailed to serve for two years. There is much to learn that takes time. One's horizons tend to widen; greater possibilities develop; one's interest in the work grows infinitely. Christian Education, in the broadest sense, offers a Secretary the privilege of a stake in rousing Christian citizenry to what may be its last stand against the shabby materialism of a sorry world. Anything less than her best is not enough to bring to the job.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

Serving as your Christian Social Relations secretary is a precious experience. I am receiving far more than I could possibly give in return, however hard I try. Thank you for one of the happiest, most wonderful years of my life.

Christian Social Relations express a love for God and our fellowmen through action reflecting a sensitive understanding of His will. What they include seems to be the least understood part of auxiliary work. Our Church provides a wealth of material to guide us to a better understanding. Few secretaries draw on it. I have prayed for the wisdom and opportunity to interpret it to them.

Christian Social Relations secretaries should make a special effort to go to the Woman's Auxiliary conference at Vade Mecum and to Kanuga. Last summer the Christian Social Relations course at Kanuga was such fundamental help and so thrilling that in the fall it was shared with district and branch secretaries meeting together. I expect to call a similar meeting this fall. With my fall letter to branch and district secretaries went an outline of program suggestions and a list of reading material. January letters included resolutions passed at the Provincial meeting. I have spoken at six auxiliary meetings, one district meeting and two district work-shops.

Probably our best work has been in social service, including volunteer work, Church institutions and overseas relief. Our hands have reached out to Japan, Korea, Jerusalem, Brazil, Alaska and Greece. We have contributed through Church World Service, ARK, Care, local, and other agencies. Money and supplies were given for use in the Ministry to the Migrants, and from one branch, funds for a portable altar. There is general participation in social worship, and we are cooperating with local Councils of Church Women. An important part of their program, some of it under the heading of Christian World Relations, falls in the field of Christian Social Relations. Through Christian Fellowship we minister to God's lonely, ill and troubled children, wherever and wherever they may be. Visits were made to prisons and hospitals. One branch held prayer meetings among the shut-ins. Another carried out a plan of the Diocesan Armed Services Committee, extending fellowship to service men from the parish by sending them the service cross and prayer book, a monthly parish letter, and having special prayers and a roll call of remembrance at services.

Efforts to solve social problems by action as an auxiliary alone or in cooperation with other groups constitute social action, one of our weak spots, but here are interesting examples. Several branches lent parish facilities for community activities and weddings. By raising funds, others helped establish and maintain Bible teaching in the schools. One branch reports great progress in efforts to obtain a suitable school building. Whatever action you begin, be sure to see it through and keep an eye on it afterwards. Some auxiliaries had programs on social legislation. Three took action protesting the proposed appointment of an ambassador to the Vatican and so informed the President, our Senators and Congressmen. One branch was instrumental in having a Town Meeting on universal military training.

There were many auxiliary programs on or related to Christian Social Relations and some social study groups. Let's have

more of them with programs that lead into action, the real objective of Christian Social Relations. Quoting from one of my favorite magazines, *The Church Woman*, "Study without action is futile; action without study is fatal."

As far as I know, we almost completely failed to respond to "The Christian Woman's Action Program for World Peace," a social action project considered most important by our National Church and Province. As individuals and auxiliaries, please adopt this step-child and give it your attention in the coming year. For individual reading on this subject and for discussion in small groups, use, "*Christian Foundations for Lasting Peace*" available from "National." None of us are exempt from highway hazards, neither lazy-passenger, driver, nor pedestrian. Another social action project will be for branches to investigate the problem of highway safety in North Carolina, particularly the high accident rate between the ages of eighteen and twenty-four, and what is being done about it, to look for the answer and to take action that will help to correct this situation that claimed 1,071 lives in this state last year, injured 15,123 and affected the lives of so many others. In support of a resolution adopted at the meeting of our Province, it is hoped that joining with all denominations we will unite with authorities in preparation for civil defense. Last, but not least, together with minority groups we will dedicate ourselves to the application of Christian principles in arriving at a mutual understanding and cooperation.

We will continue to help the North Carolina Council of Churches' Ministry to the Migrants. My fall letter will carry detailed directions about materials and clothing needed for the Refugee Work-rooms in the Anglican diocese of Jerusalem. By sending gifts of money for overseas relief through the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief, we will make sure of participating in projects approved by the World Council of Churches.

This year our National Council's Christian Social Relations Department is conducting a nation-wide survey to use as the basis for long-range planning and "to discover how all of us together may stimulate our social study and community action in the National Church, in the dioceses and in the parishes." Feeling sure of your support, I had asked that our Woman's Auxiliary be given the opportunity for closer cooperation with the Diocesan Executive Council's Christian Social Relations Department and when its chairman was called to another state, as your secretary I was drafted to carry on the survey here. In one of the parishes selected for it there is no minister and an auxiliary member has assumed survey responsibility.

There has been self-analysis at the diocesan level. To be prepared to forge ahead with plans coming out of Triennial, each branch and district should analyze its Christian Social Relations set-up and program. Both should have a well-functioning Christian Social Relations committee that studies, makes and sets plans in motion and serves as a resource. I firmly believe that if every secretary, committee member and auxiliary president would carefully read National's guide-book "When You're Chairman of Social Relations" it would pay big dividends. Only by knowing our weakness as well as our strength can we truly measure the adequacy of our stewardship and keep from leaving undone those things which we ought to have done in that part of the Master's work with which we are entrusted.

Each year through growing cooperation we come nearer to meeting our objectives. Though you may not realize it, this very important work touches each Auxiliary member in one way or another—through gifts of time and talent, gifts of clothing or gifts of money. We want you to understand this very tangible work and become even more interested in it.

PERSONNEL

The Department of Personnel is concerned with recruiting, training, placing and keeping in touch with the women workers in our church today. There is a crying need for many more trained women than are available for Directors of Religious Education, College Workers, Parish Secretaries, Social Workers, Teachers and Nurses.

The objectives of the Personnel Department are:

1. To interest young women in seeking a career in the church.
2. To assist them in securing the necessary training, providing scholarships when necessary.
3. To see that the trained workers are placed in suitable jobs.
4. To keep in touch with the women workers in the field at home and abroad.

Our emphasis now is being placed on the first of these objectives. The methods which Personnel Secretaries may use in trying to interest young women in becoming trained workers for the church are: By advertising the needs of the church so that young and old will know of the challenging opportunities awaiting young women who would like to make the service of God their life work. This is best accomplished through programs in the Auxiliary and the Y. P. S. L. and through personal contact with outstanding young people. Each Parish Secretary must be sure that the young people in her parish are aware of the professions open to them in church service.

Last year in our combined training schools—St. Mary's House, Philadelphia, St. Margaret's House, Berkeley, California and Windham House, New York City there were only forty-seven students enrolled. This is a pitifully small number for the whole United States and cannot possibly take care of all our needs.

It is hoped that each member of the Womans' Auxiliary will feel an individual responsibility in creating an interest in this

program by talking about it to the young people within her sphere of influence.

Signs of growth are also shown in the United Thank Offering with thirteen branches increasing their offering and eight branches more than doubling the annual amount turned in since 1945.

Our chief desire is to have every branch take part in all phases of the work of the auxiliary. This we feel will be done if we redouble our efforts, and give full support to our Field Worker who is so anxious to have us make full use of our capabilities.

DIOCESAN FIELD WORKER

The purpose of this work in the field is to keep the women, especially, informed and inspired, through constantly stressing what the five (5) objectives of the Woman's Auxiliary mean to Christian women who are trying to help extend the kingdom of God into the hearts and lives of all people throughout the world.

The methods used must, of necessity, be those that will first of all meet the needs of the individual groups. We try to do this through week-end visits. The reasons for these are as follows: 1st, Your field-worker finds, on account of local conditions, the week-end visits are far more profitable . . . giving better opportunities for branch meetings, conferences, to attend church and church schools, seeing more young people and to visit those who are ill or are in other ways hindered from attending church activities.

During visits I help in every way possible, in program-making, suggest and plan special meetings, such as Woman's Day and World-Prayer Day programs, Inter-cessory Days, Youth Sundays, Bazaars, etc. (I am very often called upon to speak to the congregations and church schools.)

We stress full participation, as far as possible, in all phases of the Church's program . . . that we put forth every effort to interest every woman to learn to "put first things first" (a lesson all need to learn more thoroughly) and to enjoy the rare privilege of being permitted to work in the Master's vineyard. To keep abreast of the times in the church life by study: to read Forth, Church-Ways, the North Carolina Churchman, and other church and inter-denominational literature.

To make every effort to attend St. Augustine's Conference, our District and Annual meetings . . . to foster and visit Camp DeLaney.

Number of visits . . . I have visited seventeen (17) of the eighteen (18) congregations on an average of twice a year (find it important to visit some places more often.) We have meetings

with the women and young people. Conferences often with the clergy, the branch and district officers (Diocesan, when possible).

I gain much help and inspiration from regular attendance at the meetings of the Department of Christian Education.

During vacation periods it was a rich privilege to visit Windham House and to take part in a Retreat and to share in the "W. H. Alumni" and the "Professional Church Women's" organizations. Your field-worker has been graciously accepted as a member of these organizations. I also took advantage of visiting "281" examining "What's New" in Church Literature and

selecting some needed for our work. Have visited one (1) Prison Camp in Edgecombe County with the rector and his wife at St. Luke's, Tarboro.

Results . . . It is not easy, all must agree, to estimate the results of such work as ours nor the great good we always pray will come of our efforts.

In this World-Wide organization, The Woman's Auxiliary, opportunities are so numerous, one often trembles lest some thing has been overlooked—but we do get a great satisfaction, nevertheless, when one is assured of the appreciation and can see and feel the "Yearnings" when you are told "We are so glad you have come and you have helped us so much!"

May all who read this report pray with us that all of the women in our Diocese will unite more and more in this great work and can join with the poet who says:

*"Go labor on! Spend and be spent
Thy joy to do the Father's will
It is the way the Master went
Should not the servant tread it still?"*

YOUTH WORK

There have been times when I have felt discouraged about our work for the Youth of this Diocese, and have wondered if we were as conscientious in this phase of our work as we were in some of the others. I believe that most branch secretaries share the feeling of inadequacy with me—we just don't seem able to accomplish the things that we know need to be done, and we often don't know how to go about it.

But, thank goodness for two facts. We need never feel discouraged about our young people themselves, nor need we ever for one moment think that they are inadequate. Youth, among many other things, is demanding, and while they may not be able to analyze their needs, they are acutely conscious of them; and if we of the Church give them half a chance to express themselves they will let us know what they feel that they need. It is up to us to supply these needs under Church guidance.

From the reports which I receive I am happy to report that practically every branch has some phase of Youth Work—YPSL, Altar Guilds, Acolyte Guilds, Boy and Girl Scouting—and I have noticed a growth in these activities in the past two years. These activities are splendid and I wish that I thought that I had had even a small part in shaping them, through contact with the branch secretaries and through the workshops which we have had at Vade Mecum for the past two years, but again I believe that the increase in Youth Work in our diocese is due to the young people themselves being eager and ready for the fellowship of the Church.

This brings me to the most important phase of Youth Work, and the one in which every parishoner can participate, and that is, and I cannot say it too often—letting our young people know that we love them; that we want them to share every blessing and benefit which the Church can give—work and fellowship, worship and sacraments, and we can only let them know this by welcoming them gladly in all our activities—not impatiently when they make mistakes—not critically when their way isn't our way; but as beloved children of God who look to us for guidance, but who above everything else want our loving interest. Won't each of you consider herself a "Youth Work Secretary" and give each young person in your parish a warm smile of greeting, a friendly word, and a place in your plans and projects? I firmly believe that you will see a change in the youth of your parish if you will just show them you love them.

The following list of "Duties of Youth Work Secretaries" is copied from the Youth Work Handbook:

1. Keep your Auxiliary informed of the activities and needs of the Youth.
2. Keep your Parish informed of the needs and activities of the Youth.
3. Cooperate with the Rector, Sunday School, and other organizations in procuring adult leadership.
4. Study the needs of the youth in your parish and try to interest the parish in providing the means to fill them.
5. Subscribe to Youth Leaders Mailing List—281 Fourth Ave., New York 10, N. Y., \$1.00.
6. Urge observance of special communions for youth, as designated by the National Council.

7. Interest your parish and the Auxiliary in providing scholarships for the Youth Conference, Y.P.S.L. Convention, and to the camps at Vade Mecum and Camp Delaney.
8. The Secretary is not necessarily required to act in the capacity of advisor or leader to the Youth groups, unless she has the talent, and is requested by the Rector or organization

REPORT OF THE REPRESENTATIVE ON THE STATE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

Objectives—The State Legislative Council is composed of members of 16 State organizations, representing a total membership of 105,000. Its purpose is to propose and support better social legislation in North Carolina. The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina is one of only three church groups represented.

Methods—The Council meets in Raleigh four times a year to select items for study which have been proposed by member organizations, so that in legislative years a program of action may be presented to the General Assembly in the form of actual bills. No item is placed on the agenda without careful study by technical experts, and no final program is adopted without unanimous consent by each member organization.

Weakness of Program—While the State Legislative Council is far from perfect, it is a step in the direction of better legislation. Due to the size of the Council, and infrequency of meeting, it has been impossible to have information available for study prior to our annual meeting. We should be informed on both sides of each question before any vote is taken. Some improvement will be made next year since Legislative Council Programs may be adopted in December, which will allow some time for advance study by member groups before voting.

Recommendations—Due to the increased importance of the need for Christian leaderships at all levels of government, beginning with the precinct, it is our suggestion that a Committee be appointed to study the whole field of legislation and the responsibility of the Woman's Auxiliary to it. Consideration should be given to: a. Continued membership in Legislative Council. b. Ways of channeling information to members, with consideration of appointment of Legislative Chairman in each branch of Auxiliary. c. Fields of legislative activity. Citizen responsibility, emphasizing the importance of the vote. (In last national election nearly 40 million did not vote.) Our policy towards legislation. There is a definite place for church women in the broad areas of juvenile delinquency, highway safety, and citizen responsibility and participation in government.

Tentative Program for 1953—Submitted herewith are items selected by the State Legislative Council, for your vote. Item 6 has already been rejected by one organization, and will therefore not appear on the final program. All items were listed in the March issue of the N. C. Churchman, and have been submitted to each delegate, with reasons for selection.

1. Provide at State expense for employment of attendance workers with State supervision for improving school attendance for the enforcement of compulsory school attendance law.

2. Provide for minimum wage standards.

3. Provide for the protection of children without natural guardians through clarification of legal procedures relating to personal guardianship of a minor.

4. Increase the jurisdiction of the juvenile court so as to include children 16 years of age.

5. Provide for minimum standards of all new housing.

6. Forbid the use of pari-mutual machines or other such gambling devices in connection with the operation of dog tracks and horse race tracks in any section of the State.

Church of the Good Shepherd, Rocky Mount, April 23-24

I. *Resolved*, That the Woman's Auxiliary be reminded to have a spirit of friendliness in our Churches, calling on newcomers, visiting the sick, and speaking to all who worship with us—whether they are close friends or not.

That we pray earnestly that our Heavenly Father will guide our country in the presidential election this fall, that our beloved land may be led by Christian men.

That we pray that world peace may be a reality and our loved sons and relatives may receive daily the Holy Spirit to comfort and guide them.

II. *Whereas*, The Rev. Edwin B. Jeffress, Jr., has only recently accepted the position of Director of Christian Education in the Diocese of North Carolina and director of Camp Vade Mecum, *Be It Resolved* that the gains thereby secured be brought before the people of the Diocese.

III. *Whereas*, Our retiring president, Mrs. E. F. Lucas, having been elected vice-president of the North Carolina Council of Church Women; and Mrs. E. G. Peoples, member of the Executive Board of the North Carolina Council of Church Women; and the Rt. Rev. Edwin A. Penick, member of the Executive Committee of the North Carolina Council of Churches; and the Rt. Rev. Richard H. Baker, vice-president of the North Carolina Council of Churches; and the Rt. Rev. J. I. Blair Larned, representative of the Episcopal Church of the World Council of Churches; and the Rev. Morton R. Kurtz, Executive Secretary of the North Carolina Council of Churches; and inasmuch as the interchurch movement is gaining in world force expressing itself on local, state and national levels,

Be It Resolved that the Women of the Diocese of North Carolina take their part of the responsibility of this interchurch movement on the local level.

IV. *Whereas*, The Women's Auxiliary to the National Council in the Diocese of North Carolina recognizes the public has been slow in answering the call to Civil Defense, and

Whereas, Many church women have been previously trained for work in emergencies, now, therefore

Be It Resolved that it is the sense of this Annual Meeting that the Episcopal Churches join where practicable in the Civil Defense Program.

V. *Whereas*, The Christian Woman's Action Program for World Peace was adopted by the Department of United Church Women of the National Council of Churches and by the Women of the Province of Sewanee in 1951 meeting, and has been urged for study and action by the National Staff of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Protestant Episcopal Church; therefore

Be It Resolved that the women of the Diocese of North Carolina dedicate their influence in home, church, community, business and government to build lasting peace and adopt this program. We believe that we should strengthen and use our spiritual resources; therefore, we shall pray that we may be used for peace.

We believe that "This Nation under God" can be a Christian Democracy; therefore, we will live democracy in our home town every day.

We believe that, next to the churches, today's best instrument for peace is the United Nations; therefore, we will know and support it.

We believe that we must identify ourselves with the needs, the sufferings, the longings of the people of the world; therefore, we will discipline ourselves to share our abundance of spiritual and material resources.

We believe we must understand the issues in the struggle for peace; therefore, we will study and discuss with our family and neighbors the issues of the peace.

SECTION IV

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be, "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

ARTICLE II

Object

The object of this organization shall be to help in carrying out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church: Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service.

ARTICLE III

Membership

The membership of this organization shall be composed of all Parish and Mission Branches within the Diocese.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: A President, a First Vice-President, a Second Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of Christian Education, a Secretary of Christian Social Relations, a Secretary of Supply, a Secretary of Personnel, a Custodian of United Thank Offering.

Section 2. These officers with the District Chairmen, members of the Executive Council and Chairmen of Standing Committees shall constitute the Executive Board and shall meet at least twice a year at the call of the President.

ARTICLE V

Duties of Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for. She shall also preside at meetings, and at every Annual Meeting shall address the Auxiliary. She shall make a report to the Diocesan Convention.

Section 2. The First Vice-President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have specific duties to be decided in conference with the President.

Section 3. The Second Vice-President shall edit the Annual Report and Handbook of Information of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of North Carolina.

Section 4. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist other officers in preparing and having printed the Annual Report and at each Annual Meeting shall make a report.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering, and shall make a report of same to the Annual Meeting. At the end of every fiscal year the Treasurer's accounts shall be verified by a public auditor. The Treasurer's report, as audited, shall be published in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Section 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Education shall promote and stimulate educational work in the branches of the Diocese by every means in her power, and carry out the program of the National Department of Religious Education.

Section 7. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Relations shall co-operate with the Christian Social Relations Departments of the Diocese and the National Council, in the promotion of their plans and programs.

Section 8. The Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in the Spring and Fall of each year, and shall remit immediately for investment to the Treasurer of the National Council.

Section 9. The Secretary of Supply shall have charge of the work of the Supply Department.

Section 10. The Secretary of Personnel shall cooperate with the Personnel Departments of the branches and districts in the Diocese and of the National Council in effort to promote the selection of church work as a vocation by young people and others.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. All Diocesan officers shall be elected for a term of three years. The Treasurer, the United Thank Offering Custodian, and the Secretary of Personnel to be elected at the first annual meeting after the Triennial: the President, Secretary of Supply and Secretary of Christian Social Relations to be elected at the second annual meeting after the Triennial: the President to take office at the third annual meeting after the Triennial: Vice Presidents and Secretary of Christian Education to be elected at the third meeting after the Triennial.

Section 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President.

ARTICLE VII

Districts

Section 1. For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into districts.

Section 2. A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman duly elected by her District for a term of three years. In case of vacancy the Vice-Chairman shall serve as Chairman.

Section 3. Each District shall hold at least one and, if possible, two meetings a year.

ARTICLE VIII

Election of Diocesan Officers

Section 1. Prior to the Annual Meeting, the President shall appoint from the Executive Board a nominating committee of three who shall consider proposed nominees to fill the elective offices at the Meeting, and from the names suggested or considered the Committee shall recommend to the Meeting the nominees for such offices. The consent of the nominees shall be obtained by the Committee before making the recommendation. Nominations may be made from the floor of the Meeting by any delegate provided the consent of the nominee has been first obtained. A majority vote shall be required for all elections. In case there are more than two nominees for the same office and no candidate receives a majority vote, the name receiving the smallest number of votes shall be dropped from the ballot.

Section 2. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund for Calendar Year preceding the meeting.

ARTICLE IX

Finance

The Executive Committee in consultation with the Bishop shall prepare a budget for the year. The budget shall be presented to the branches for their support at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Section 2. From the total amount pledged towards the budget, one-half shall apply to the work of the National Council, one-half to the work of the Diocese.

Section 3. The United Thank Offering and contributions for the Supply Department shall be in addition to the payments on the budget.

ARTICLE X

Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present, provided a written copy of the proposed amendments has been filed with the Diocesan Secretary, and a notice of same mailed to each branch by the Secretary at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting.

BY-LAWS

The place and time of the Annual Meeting shall be approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

1. The order of Business for the Annual Meeting shall be arranged by the President and the Executive Committee.

2. Each Parish Branch having fifty members or less shall be represented by the Branch President and one other delegate (appointed by the President or elected by the Branch). The President, or her representative, and the delegates each has a vote. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the Branch to an additional delegate with power to vote. The Diocesan Officers, District Chairmen, and the Chairmen of Standing Committees shall be empowered to vote on all business and election of officers.

3. Past Presidents of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be delegates-at-large to Annual Meetings with voice and vote.

4. Each Branch shall be assessed twenty-five cents per member to provide for Provisional Expenses, printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of Speakers, and other items necessary for the proper administration of this organization. This shall be known as the Central Fund.

5. One fourth of the Branches having the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at the Annual Meeting. Five members shall constitute a quorum at the Executive Committee Meetings.

A. At the Fall District Meetings, all Branches are requested to submit names for consideration by the Diocesan Nominating Committee for officers to be elected at the following Annual Meeting. It is the privilege of the Branches to submit names from any Branch in the Diocese without the consent of the persons named. The Chairman of each District shall send to the Chairman of the Diocesan Nominating Committee all names submitted at her District Meeting.

B. It shall be the privilege of Branches and individual members to submit to the Chairman of the Nominating Committee names for consideration for officers to be elected. These names may be submitted at any time previous to six weeks before the Annual Meeting.

- C. The Nominating Committee shall present a ticket of one or more nominees for each office to be filled. The Chairman shall send this ticket to each Branch three weeks prior to the Annual Meeting. In addition to the ticket presented by this Committee, any nominations indorsed by three Branches and with the consent of the nominees may then be made. Such nominations shall be sent to the Chairman of the Nominating Committee one week prior to the Annual Meeting and the Chairman shall inform the Annual Meeting of any such names. Nominations may be made from the floor of the Annual Meeting by any delegate, provided the consent of the nominees has been obtained.
- D. The incoming President and the incoming Secretary of Christian Education, by virtue of their offices, shall be declared delegates one and two from the Diocese to the Triennial. A nominee from the Negro District, as representing the minority group in the Diocese, shall be elected delegate number three from the Diocese.
- E. The Nominating Committee shall submit a ticket including the names of the incoming President, the incoming Secretary of Christian Education and the nominee from the Negro District, together with three other nominations for delegates and six nominations for alternates to the Triennial. The alternate for delegate number three shall be a member of the Negro District.
- F. The ticket presented by the Nominating Committee for delegates to Provincial Auxiliary Meetings shall include a name from the Negro District as representing the minority group in the Diocese. An alternate for this delegate shall be named from the Negro District.
- G. Nominations for both delegates and alternates may be made from the floor of the Annual Meeting.
- H. The election of alternates shall follow the announcement of the results of the balloting on delegates.
6. When any office in the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina is declared vacant by the Executive Board, the acting Nominating Committee (being governed by Article VIII, Section I) shall present to the Executive Board a name or names to be elected by the said Board to fill the declared vacancy. Should a vacancy occur in the office of President, the First Vice-President shall serve until the next Annual Meeting, at which time an election shall be held for the unexpired term.
7. The Diocesan President shall appoint at the beginning of her second year in office the following Chairmen to serve for three years: Chairman of Young People's Work, Interracial Chairman, Missionary Correspondent, Director of Church Periodical Club and Chairman of Legislative Committee and Representative on the North Carolina Legislative Council.
8. The District Officers shall correspond to the Diocesan Officers and shall be elected at the first meeting of the District after the Diocesan Annual Meeting.
- The District Chairman shall appoint the following Chairmen to serve for three years: (1) Church Periodical Club, (2) Missionary Correspondent, (3) Young People's Work.
9. Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be the authority in all questions of parliamentary law not covered by these By-Laws.
10. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates of any Annual Meeting.
