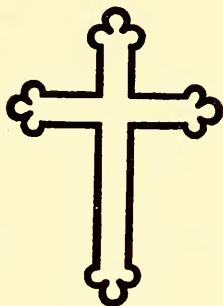

# MINUTES

## OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

---

The Fifty-first Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Diocese of North Carolina convened Thursday morning, April 20th, 1933, at eleven o'clock, in the Church of the Holy Comforter, Burlington, N. C. Devotional Exercises were conducted by Bishop Edwin A. Penick.

The Rev. David T. Eaton extended to the Auxiliary cordial greetings to which Mrs. H. S. Hartzell responded.

Appointment of the following committees were then announced:

*Resolutions*—Mrs. James Cordon, Chairman; Mrs. Johnston King, Mrs. J. L. Gilmer, Mrs. Ross Sigmon.

*Courtesy*—Miss Katherin Hilliard, Chairman; Mrs. Carroll Spencer, Mrs. Haywood Foxhall, Mrs. W. D. Clark, Mrs. Lawrence Higgins.

Miss Clark at this time delivered her annual address to the Convention in which she expressed her appreciation for the privilege of serving as President of the Auxiliary, gave a resumé of the work accomplished during the past year and made certain recommendations for the future.

Interesting reports from the Diocesan Officers followed. These reports, which reflect progress in all departments, will be printed in full in the Annual Report.

Bishop Penick then presented Mrs. Beverly Ober, Secretary of Religious Education in the Diocese of Maryland. Mrs. Ober conducted the Noonday Prayers and Meditation and delivered a most inspiring address on the United Thank Offering.

At 12:30 Group Conferences were held after which Luncheon was served in the Parish House.

The Convention was again called to order at 2:15. Forty-seven Branches responded to roll call. The Committee on Credentials reported that there was a total of one hundred and fifteen members of the Convention with power to vote.

Election of President of the Auxiliary and nomination of a Representative on the Diocesan Executive Council was then in order. Miss Emma Hall of Charlotte was duly elected President. A motion was passed that the new President of the Woman's Auxiliary be nominated as a member of the Executive Council of the Diocese.

The Rev. J. A. Vaché spoke enthusiastically in behalf of Vade Mecum, calling special attention to the Woman's Auxiliary conference to be held August 1-15th. Camps for the young people will also be held during the summer. The Auxiliary was asked to support this venture as far as possible.

Mrs. Cruikshank made a very earnest appeal for the support of Saint Mary's School, stating that one girl from every parish in the five Carolina Dioceses would complete the full enrollment of the School.

The Rev. W. H. Wheeler brought a message from the Thompson Orphanage, expressing his appreciation to the Auxiliary for the clothing of seventy-seven children and for the new laundry equipment procured by the Octagon Soap Wrappers. He urged the continuation of this plan of collecting the coupons so as to establish a discretionary fund for the Orphanage.

In the absence of Miss Albertson the Rev. Mr. Vaché reported on Saint Mary's House at the Woman's College of the University.

Mrs. F. S. Spruill appealed to the Auxiliary for contributions toward the expense of remodeling Ravenscroft, the Bishop's home in Raleigh. A motion was passed that the Auxiliary accept this privilege. Upon motion, the roll was called in order to give the Branches present an opportunity of contributing to this fund and the sum of \$279.50 was pledged. Other Branches expressed their willingness to give but at this time they were unable to state the amount.

The following Committee Chairmen made interesting and encouraging reports: Mrs. E. K. Powe on the Prayer Partnership Plan; Miss Camille Hunt on the Recruiting Work; Mrs. B. C. Sharpe on Work with the Isolated, and Mrs. Ben White on the Valle Crucis Scholarship. Reports from the Church Periodical Club and from the Committee on the Promotion of the Young People's Work were read by the Secretary.

A message from the President of the Diocesan Colored Auxiliary was then read. In connection with this report Bishop Penick explained that there were no longer Convocations in the Diocese. At the Diocesan Convention last May all racial dis-

tinctions were obliterated. He suggested the appointment of a Committee to study the relationship of the Colored Auxiliary to the Diocese and to clarify the situation. A motion was passed that such a committee be appointed.

Mrs. F. S. Spruill asked the Auxiliary to consider the purchase of a portrait of Bishop Atkinson which was displayed during the Convention. The President stated that she would appoint a committee with power to investigate the advisability of purchasing this portrait at a price not to exceed \$150.00.

A letter was read from the President of the Girls' Friendly Society expressing her regret that she was unable to attend the Convention.

At 4:30 the Meeting recessed for the day.

Evening Prayer was held at eight o'clock at which time Bishop Penick delivered the Convention Sermon. His theme was History as the Interpreter of the present difficulties through which the Church is now passing and that similar conditions have been met in the past and may be overcome in the present by Faith and Hope. The offering at this service will be given for scholarship aid at Vade Mecum.

Friday morning, April 21st, at 7:30 Holy Communion was celebrated by Bishop Penick, assisted by the Rev. David T. Eaton. At this service the United Thank Offering was presented followed by the Commemoration of the Departed.

At 9:45 the Business Session opened with Devotions conducted by the Rev. David T. Eaton. The minutes of the preceding day were read and approved.

Interesting reports from the following Group Conferences held on Thursday were given: Supply Work, Religious Education, Christian Social Service, United Thank Offering and Treasurers.

The President at this time explained the Program of the Auxiliary Conference which will convene at Vade Mecum August 1-15th. Bishop Penick will teach a course on the Life of Christ; Mrs. W. J. Gordon on the Mission Study Book; Mrs. Theodore Partrick, Jr., on the Principles of Teaching; the Rev. Theodore Partrick, Jr., on the Prayer Book, and the Rev. J. A. Vaché on Women of the Old Testament. The Rev. Roderick Jackson will act as Chaplain.

Bishop Penick then introduced the Rev. Roderick Jackson, Missionary to Japan, who gave a most interesting address on the Various Phases of the Work of Our Church in Japan.

Miss Venetia Cox, a Missionary to China, was presented to the Convention. She spoke for a few minutes on her work in the foreign field.

Brief talks on four Diocesan Auxiliary Objectives for 1933 were delivered by outstanding women of the Auxiliary: Mrs. R. B. Coit of Greensboro spoke on Greater Emphasis on the United Thank Offering; Mrs. W. D. Burwell of Henderson on Organization of Woman's Work into One Unit; Mrs. J. D. Quern of Charlotte on the Development of Individual Responsibility, and Mrs. William J. Gordon of Spray on the Power of Prayer.

Mrs. W. W. Simms stated that the United Thank Offering presented at the early service of the Convention amounted to \$1,906.83. She urged the Auxiliary to have as its objective a fall offering sufficient to make the 1933 offering equal at least, and if possible, to exceed that of 1932. She expressed her gratitude to Mrs. Ober for her contribution to the Program of the Convention, whereupon the Auxiliary gave Mrs. Ober a rising vote of thanks.

At this time Mrs. Ober addressed the Convention on the Various Objectives and Helps in the Work of Religious Education.

The Rev. J. L. Jackson of Charlotte informed the Auxiliary of the Present Status of the National Church and of the Diocese of North Carolina.

Mrs. James Cordon, Chairman of the Committee on Resolutions, presented the following report:

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina wishes to express its deep sense of loss in the death of our beloved Bishop and Friend, Joseph Blount Cheshire, who departed this life on December 27, 1932, and its appreciation and gratitude for the example of his Godly Life.

As a tribute to the loving memory of Bishop Cheshire the Auxiliary then stood in silent prayer after which Bishop Penick read appropriate prayers.

The following resolutions were adopted by the Convention, viz.:

(1) That the Woman's Auxiliary sponsor the planting of a shrub, tree or flowering plant in the Cathedral Garden, Washington, D. C., in memory of our Beloved Bishop Cheshire, the President to appoint a committee for this purpose.

(2) That the Auxiliary pledge its continuance of the collection of Octagon Soap Wrappers for the benefit of the Thompson Orphanage.

(3) That the Executive Board be requested to consider the advisability of omitting from the Budget of 1934 the pledges for scholarship aid to Valle Crucis, Penland and Bishop Tuttle School, and are hereby authorized to make such changes in the Budget as they deem wise.

(4) That the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina in the Annual Meeting assembled in the Church of the Holy Comforter, Burlington, N. C., April 21, 1933, does hereby authorize and empower the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary in this Diocese to take any, or such action, as, in its judgment may be necessary and advisable to protect the interests of the Auxiliary with regard to the account of the Treasurer of the Auxiliary, Mrs. Wm. P. Little, in the sum of \$1,157.80 on deposit in the Page Trust Company, Raleigh, N. C., on March 2, 1933.

(5) That the Auxiliary hereby express by a rising vote its sincere appreciation for the devoted and effective leadership of the retiring President, Miss Rena Clark, and her Secretary, Mrs. H. H. Philips, during their successful administration of the last three years.

The Committee on Resolutions then presented the following eight recommendations of the President, Miss Rena Clark, all of which were adopted:

I. That the Auxiliary should represent the services of the entire womanhood of the Church.

II. For every Branch a Program that entails responsibility outside of the Parish as well as within.

III. Rotation of officers every two or three years.

IV. Knowledge of Missionaries—especially those from the Diocese of North Carolina.

V. That all Report Blanks be sent in duplicate form, one to be returned to the District Officer and one to the Diocesan Officer.

VI. That the time limit for the Honor Roll be changed to February 1st.

VII. Full payment for all scholarships—Penland, Valle Crucis and Bishop Tuttle.

VIII. That the Auxiliary devise some means of contributing to the deficit of \$145,000 needed to complete the budget for the National Church this year.

(6) That all funds pledged by the Auxiliary this year for the Advance Work Program be applied to the deficit of \$145,000 existing in the National Church; and that we endeavor to stand firmly behind any plans that the Diocese may present.

**REPORT OF COURTESY COMMITTEE**

Your Courtesy Committee feel that we are voicing the sentiment of every member of this Convention in expressing our sincere gratitude to all who have prepared for us such a feast of good things both material and spiritual. We hope that each delegate may carry home to her Branch of the Auxiliary something of the zeal and enthusiasm stirred in us by the inspiring messages brought to us by our Bishop, by Mrs. Ober and by the Rev. Roderick Jackson of Japan, as well as by our own officers and especially by the words of our beloved retiring President.

We would also express our appreciation of the generous hospitality extended by the women of the Church of the Holy Comforter, and shall always think of Burlington as a city of delightful homes and charming hostesses. Our thanks are also due to the Rector for the use of this beautiful Church, such a perfect setting for our United Thank Offering Communion.

In spite of clouds and rain and cold north winds, we shall carry away only the brightest, happiest memories of this our Fifty-first Annual Convention.

**PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS TO THE CONVENTION OF 1933**

*Dear Members of the Auxiliary and Friends:*

Again it is my pleasure to greet you on the occasion of the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of North Carolina. How vividly our minds revert to that meeting last year in Henderson where we celebrated our Golden Jubilee; the inspiration of which no doubt has served many times as a light in our darkness. Since then, death has removed from our midst the Rt. Rev. Joseph Blount Cheshire, our beloved Bishop and our oldest friend. I pause to pay tribute to him whose memory will always be one of our most treasured possessions.

Today marks the end of the first year in the second half of the century in the life of the Auxiliary in this Diocese. If we are to be faithful interpreters of that life to others, there must be a steadiness of purpose in all that we do. We must rise above the difficulties and look beyond the problems that confront us; we must realize that growth involves change; we must know that the value of anything lies in the use we make of it. We must remember that after all what counts are our motives, our methods, our attitudes—they reflect our own outlook on life.

Paradoxically as it may sound, the past fifty years reveal tremendous changes, yet there seems no change at all. The record of those earlier years disclose many of the same ideals and objectives, the same warnings and weaknesses, that characterize our efforts of today. It is conclusive evidence that those truths and ideals of life which constitute the eternal aspects of it always remain the same. It is true that we have grown numerically, financially, and, I hope, spiritually—yet it is not the magnificence of glorious deeds that availeth, but the magnificence of a glorious spirit. And that is what I would have to stand out among us.

This year you will observe that the Convention has been shortened. Your Executive Board did not think it in keeping with the spirit of the times to proceed with the usual program. That you may not lose by this curtailment, I have endeavored to concentrate on those matters that concern us most. An intimate knowledge of the National Church, the Diocese, and the Auxiliary is the vital duty of each of us. What we think and do is what the Church of our time believes and does for the world. I have set as the keynote of this Convention "Faith and Courage"—qualities that we need above all others in this time

of chaos and uncertainty. We must make sure however that our Faith is not placed in values false and vain; we must remember that

“Courage isn't a brilliant dash,  
A daring deed in a moment's flash,  
It's something deep in the soul of man  
Working always to serve some plan.”

It is in that spirit that I would have you enter into the procedure of these two days.

In reviewing the records for the past year I find that it has been a good one. Written reports, personal contacts and tangible evidence give proof that the Auxiliary has gone forward, but I am compelled to confess that her progress is not up to her full capacity. Careless thinking, lack of preparation and, I fear, even indifference are largely responsible. The branches are beginning more and more to have a well rounded program consisting of worship, study, work and gifts. Attention given to Religious Education, Christian Social Service and the Supply Department testify to their importance. The United Thank Offering still retains its beloved place in the hearts of many. The Treasurer presents a splendid showing for all funds. While it is true that our material gifts are not as large as those of former years, in proportion to the wealth of the donors they far exceed those of more prosperous times. From this Diocese two girls have entered Church work; Ethel Louise Byerly, a product of Summer Volunteer Work, who is being trained for Religious Education and Martha Dabney Jones who is working among Young People in Eastern Oregon. Four young men have entered the ministry. Interest in and responsibility for Young People and Students are a real obligation. Knowledge of the *whole* program of the Church, not of just a part of it, is steadily gaining ground. Two new branches have been organized and additional groups added to branches already established. The sum of \$1,128.00 was contributed for the deficit in the National Church budget of last year. Sixty-six children have been clothed at the Thompson Orphanage and sufficient Octagon Soap Wrappers have finally been procured for the laundry equipment. Constant effort is being made to strengthen and develop the devotional life of the individual. Believing that these are fundamental requisites, observance of Days of Intercession, Corporate Communion and the reading of religious books and Church papers are constantly urged. To Bishop Penick we

are indebted for a most helpful and adequate "Form of Meditation and Prayer" which was used on St. Andrew's Day. The special intention for that day was the success of the "Every Member Canvass." The Auxiliary realizes that spiritual poverty is bound to be the result of spiritual unpreparedness.

Perhaps the outstanding event of the past year was the visit of Mrs. D. D. Taber, a National Field Worker. That she was able to do much of permanent value is clearly shown in the activities and renewed life of many branches. In some places nothing of consequence was accomplished; due no doubt to a combination of causes.

For me the past year has been filled with many activities, all of which have been interested and encouraging. I have held two Executive Board meetings, attended ten District meetings, one Educational Institute, the Adult Conference at Kanuga where it was my privilege to plan the program for Auxiliary Day and preside on that occasion. I have spoken at several branch meetings and have held conferences with Diocesan Officers and other leaders. Illness in my family prevented me from attending the Provincial Synod at Kanuga where I was scheduled to make a brief talk on Prayer. In monthly letters to each branch and to members of the Executive Board, I have endeavored to direct attention to matters which concern all of us. In addition, the Carolina Churchman has given me other means of presenting subjects pertaining not only to the Diocese but to the Church at large.

Today we elect a new President and a Representative on the Executive Council of the Diocese. I recommend that the same person shall be chosen for both offices. May we remember that great natural ability is not a prerequisite to effective Christian service. Those who are diligent in their present service should be called to higher service.

I desire to bring before you at this time a notable addition to our Diocesan equipment—the new Conference Centre, Vade Mecum. Last summer very successful Camps for Young People were held there; this year, in addition to these, there will be an Auxiliary Conference of two weeks for all women of the Diocese. A program has been planned in which the strongest leaders of the Diocese are to take part. In the past there has been such a small percentage of women to attend Conferences that I am prone to think that they do not realize what delightful affairs they are. My own experience at Kanuga has proved of such

help to me that I cannot recommend them too strongly. *Vade Mecum* belongs to us; it is accessible to all; the cost is very low; the standard is high. Shall it prove of great value to the Diocese or shall it fail? The responsibility rests on you and me. I therefore appeal to you for your unqualified support of this venture.

It is with deep regret that I inform you of the resignation of the Treasurer, Mrs. William P. Little, to take effect May 1st. The Executive Board has elected Mrs. R. B. Davis of Rocky Mount, a former Treasurer, to fill the unexpired term which will end in 1934. The postponement of the Provincial Educational Institute which was to have been held in Charlotte, April 6-8, is a real disappointment. Unsettled conditions in the financial world made it unquestionably the wisest course to pursue. Also for your information I desire to make the following statement in regard to the funds of the Auxiliary in the Page Trust Company of Raleigh which closed at the beginning of the Banking Holiday and has never reopened. The records show that the Auxiliary had on deposit there as of March 1st, 1933, the sum of \$1,137.47. Of this amount \$650.99 is a balance in Funds Account from 1932; the remainder, \$486.48, was contributed in 1933. A new account has been opened by the Treasurer in the Wachovia Bank and Trust Company of Raleigh.

As your leader for the past three years, I have come into very close contact with every phase of Auxiliary work. To plans and problems, I have given time, thought and study. With no intention of infringing upon the rights of my successor, I venture to suggest the following recommendations for your consideration:

1st. That the Auxiliary should represent the services of the entire womanhood of the Church.

2nd. For every branch a program that entails responsibility outside of the Parish as well as within.

3rd. Rotation of officers every two or three years.

4th. Knowledge of Missionaries—especially those from the Diocese of North Carolina.

5th. That all report blanks be sent in duplicate form, one to be returned to District Officer and one to Diocesan Officer.

6th. That the time limit for the Honor Roll be changed to February 1st.

7th. Full payment for all scholarships—Penland, Valle Crucis and Bishop Tuttle.

8th. That the Auxiliary devise some means of contributing to the deficit of \$145,000 needed to complete the budget for the National Church this year.

As my term of office draws to a close, I am bewildered by many questions—what have I accomplished, whercin have I failed? Although I have given to you the best of which I have been capable, how often I must have been a disappointment. To many I have been of no help; to some I am only a myth. I would like to think that for others I have had a part—even a small one—in helping them to possess a fuller knowledge and appreciation of what the Auxiliary represents. My desire has been to emphasize the spiritual side, not the mechanical; to impress upon you the tremendous power derived from meditation, prayer and Corporate Communion; to have the Auxiliary a real force in the Parish. And as I think back upon these three years, my heart fills with gratitude for the opportunities you have given me. My life is much the richer and fuller. New understanding and deeper insight have come through experience. My returns far exceed my investments. With deep appreciation I acknowledge your loyalty, your coöperation, your understanding. To the branch at Chapel Hill, I am grateful for the hospitality extended during my Executive Board Meetings there.

May the Holy Spirit rest upon us and upon all of our work. May we have light to guide us, courage to support us and faith to sustain us, now and forever more.

Interesting material is furnished us for these programs, and it is essential that we study and know about the Mission Fields where our allotments are sent.

Please continue with your loyal support and prayers. Send me boxes of second-hand clothing, and above all return your pledge and report cards promptly. Some Branches sent their cards too late to be included in the year's report.

May God bestow His richest blessing on all of us for carrying out His Commission "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

### CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT

It is probable, in the life of the Auxiliary, there has never been as great need for Christian Social Service among deserving people, as during the year that has just ended.

Worthy trained workers without any fault of their own have been thrown out of employment, during this time of world unrest, and have faced for the first time real poverty.

The Church and the Auxiliary have had rich opportunities for service; and it is with grateful hearts that we report a tremendous lot of work accomplished.

We have coöperated with the Red Cross in making literally thousands of garments, and with the Salvation Army and Welfare Organizations in supplying food and fuel for the needy. We have also coöperated in the feeding of many undernourished school children. We have done a great deal of Clinic and Prison work. It is impossible to estimate in monetary value the numerous trays and medicines we have given.

Our work among the deaf-mutes in Greensboro, Durham and Erwin has gone forward, and we are encouraged to organize this work in other places.

Besides our usual gifts, we have endeavored to establish the custom of making Memorial Offerings to the Thompson Orphanage and hope to stress this feature more and more.

### REPORT OF DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

The year of 1932 showed definite increase in interest in the Church's educational program and in response to this interest and requests for assistance of various kinds, we requested the services of one of the National Field Secretaries of the Auxiliary, and in the fall Mrs. D. D. Taber, for nine years National Field Secretary, came into the Diocese. For three months Mrs. Taber gave her entire time and visited most of our Branches discussing plans, aims, programs, etc., and making suggestions from her broad experience. Judging from reports since her visit, the scope of our work has been widened, organizations strengthened, understanding of opportunities increased and we feel certain that permanent good will result from her stay in our Diocese.

One of Mrs. Taber's suggestions was a list of suggested subjects for program meetings with reference material. In February, I sent such a list of twelve subjects, to every Branch and District Secretary, with a letter explaining that these were only *suggestions* to be used if needed and in the order best suited to each group.

I hope we can, all, realize that the object of a program of Religious (Christian) education is not simply programs for meetings or study classes, important as these things are, but that we will take as our objectives, "Growth and Development of our Christian Lives" and "Understanding of the Enterprise of the Kingdom of God and Participation in that Enterprise." It will be necessary for each group to make a careful survey of its needs and to select an aim for the year that will lead toward our objective. Our program should include Bible classes, Church services, devotional reading, leadership training, to promote *understanding*. From the present condition in the Church, we realize that it is imperative for us to become intelligently informed and I am urging that we emphasize our Missionary work.

I would suggest that we attempt to make our program the program for the whole Parish or Mission and that we strive for intelligent, convinced, functioning Christians.

The United Thank Offering in the Diocese of North Carolina reached its peak in the year 1928, when our gifts amounted to \$7,127.48. Each year since has shown a steady decline.

At the February meeting of the National Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, Mrs. Henry Hill Pierce of New York was appointed Chairman of a committee charged with the responsibility of stimulating interest in the United Thank Offering during the remainder of this triennium. To Mrs. Hill's inquiry I have replied: "I do not think decrease in the Offering from the Diocese of North Carolina is due to weakened interest, but rather to drastic reduction of incomes."

Is this entirely true?

Have we, the Custodians of the Diocese, been earnest and tireless in our efforts to keep the Thank Offering in the minds and hearts of our women?

Have we placed proper emphasis on that Offering which heads the list—the Offering of prayer?

Has our appeal been a living thing, aglow with the fire of our own love?

Have we created in our women a feeling of responsibility toward those who represent us as God's messengers?

Have we sought to establish any relation between the members of the Woman's Auxiliary and our United Thank Offering workers?

Have we provided stirring programs, earnest speakers, forceful pageants as a means of arousing interest?

Have we, the women of the Diocese of North Carolina, held up the hands of our faithful Custodians in their efforts to promote the Thank Offering?

Have we tried to carry out their suggestions?

Have we been quick to speak a word to some woman who does not know the joy of a share in our Gift?

Has our Thank Offering been a spasmodic thing of which we have to be reminded twice a year, or remembered faithfully in gratitude for God's goodness to us?

Have we recognized the Thank Offering as a vital force in bringing the Kingdom of God on earth?

It is a beautiful thing to speak of the United Thank Offering as "an overflow"; to say it is separate and apart from budgets and quotas; that the words "assessment" and "allotment" are not used in this connection. But what of the word "responsibility"? Does it apply when we consider the two hundred women who have made of their *lives* a great Thank Offering? Is it a serious matter that our thoughtlessness hinders their labors?

Can we in full truth answer Mrs. Hill's inquiry and still place reduction of our gifts *entirely* on the shoulders of weakened incomes?

Closer contacts with our workers and better acquaintance with their undertakings for the Master are my hope and program for the coming year.

And, oh my friends, take this message home with you! Live close to your Thank Offering! Let its true meaning influence your "prayers and gifts and joyful service" and we shall not be hurt again with reports of decreased offerings.

## DISTRICT OF WAKE

The outstanding accomplishment for Wake District during the past year has been the great amount of Social Service Work done locally by each branch. The Lucy Pittenger Branch, Good Shepherd, stored used clothing and donated food supplies at the Parish house for use as needed. St. Anne's paid part of a man's salary when he was out of work. They also did some work among the prisoners. Christ Church helped fourteen families, clothed six orphans, sent ten boxes of clothing, one box of shoes and 30 yards of dress material to the Thompson Orphanage. They sent \$319.00 in money, plus \$65.00 in individual donations to the Thompson Orphanage and \$70.00 to another worthy cause. St. Stephen's, Erwin, contributed to the Coolee Clinic. St. Saviour's did extensive social service work among its own members. St. Paul's took care of families at Christmas time and distributed food, clothing and magazines.

It is with regret that we report that St. Gabriel's at Selma and St. John's at Wake Forest, on account of diminished membership, have ceased to function as branches. However, it is the purpose of the District Chairman to keep in touch with the members and invite them to consolidate with a near-by branch until such time as an increase in membership warrants reorganization of these branches.

Two new Associate Auxiliaries have been organized, one at Christ Church and one, St. Hilda's, with sixteen members at Good Shepherd. Good Shepherd has also organized a Girl Scout Troop. They report fifteen members of the Auxiliary teaching in the Church School.

Over \$594.00 has been sent in for the United Thank Offering. All branches have responded well to the call for Soap Wrappers.

All branches held Lenten Study Classes and observed the Intercessory Days.

The Spring District Meeting was held at Christ Church and the Fall meeting at St. Saviour's with good attendance.

At the Fall meeting Mrs. D. D. Taber of the National Field Department was present. She returned October 18th and held a Diocesan Educational Institute at Good Shepherd Church. Following this she spent three days holding meetings with the different branches.

Mrs. Victor Moore was elected District Supply Secretary to succeed Mrs. H. J. Bryson.

A constructive suggestion came from St. Stephen's. This was that each department secretary say the prayer for her department at each monthly meeting.

The stress of the times seems to inspire our branches to double their efforts. Hence we are anticipating active and earnest work during the coming year.

Reverend Mr. Lawrence, of Chapel Hill, closed the meeting with prayer.

The week following this meeting, Mrs. Taber visited all the branches in this District, except one.

It is a pleasure to serve a District, which has such efficient and conscientious members.

Rev. Milton A. Barber, rector of Christ Church, Raleigh, explained in detail the Forward Movement and urged all present to realize the necessity for sacrifice in order to make pledges for the work of the Church. He said that out of gratitude to God, giving should be a sacramental thing.

Mrs. D. D. Taber, National Field Worker, in a very helpful talk presented some new ideas with regard to problems which confront members of the Auxiliary.

During the past year the Recruiting Secretary reported that three young people have offered themselves for life service: Miss Almeria Gordon of Spray, Miss Sadie Robeson who is now at Valle Crucis and Wade Webb who is at the Thompson Orphanage. Miss Robeson and Miss Webb are both from St. Andrew's Mission, Rockingham County.

I think the Woman's Auxiliary in the District of Guilford has a broad conception of what the Church stands for in the world and a full realization of its obligations and responsibilities.

#### DISTRICT OF FORSYTH-ROWAN

Taber, Field Secretary of the National Council, discussed at length the work of the Woman's Auxiliary, and announced an institute to be held at St. Luke's, Salisbury, in November to make plans for the study of the American Indian. Special work of the Social Service Committee, which is the scholarship at Valle Crucis School was voted to be continued and a letter from the holder of the scholarship, Marjory Williamson, of Winston-Salem, was read. Social Service needs have been met in a very large measure.

Miss Ruth Hairston, Recruiting Secretary, reported a volunteer for missionary work at Philadelphia Training School, Miss Ethel Byerly, of Cooleemee. She is there as the result of her Summer Volunteer work.

The Institute held at Salisbury with Mrs. Taber as leader in November had a large attendance from the entire District. Very interesting plans were worked out in detail for the study groups.

Attendance at District meetings is exceptional, eleven branches being represented at the Fall Meeting and twelve of the fourteen enrolled branches in the District being represented in the Spring.

This closes ten years of the District organization. The District started with ten branches, two of which, St. Joseph's at Spencer and Ascension at China Grove, later ceased to exist. There are now fourteen active branches.

### DISTRICT OF MECKLENBURG

A general meeting of all the women has been held once a month which has been very helpful.

A greater interest has been shown in the United Thank Offering. Requests have come from branches and individuals for the Blue Boxes. Although the offering may not have been as large, it represents a larger number of individuals united in thanking Almighty God for their daily blessings.

The branches have responded well in the Box Supply Work. With the exception of one, all did sewing, many pledging money in addition. Valuable boxes of clothing, both new and second-hand, were sent out.

Religious Education in the District has been stressed for the past two years. The Educational Secretary, Mrs. Rosborough, visited all the branches, offering suggestions and help in promoting the study classes.

During 1932 the needs for Social Service have been very great and the individual branches have been active in meeting them.

At the Fall Meeting Mrs. F. H. Dillon, of Monroe, was elected Prayer Partner Custodian to succeed Mrs. G. Robin Brem, Charlotte, who had served three years, and Mrs. Edward Livesay, Charlotte, was elected Social Service Secretary to succeed Mrs. D. A. Gammage who resigned.

### DISTRICT OF RICHMOND

The Richmond District now has five Auxiliary branches instead of four, Southern Pines' splendid Guild having recently organized as a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. Two District meetings were held in 1932. All branches are on the Honor Roll and there seems to be increasing understanding of the Auxiliary's place in the Church and a desire to coöperate in all phases of the work.

At the Spring Meeting in Southern Pines reports were heard from District officers. The Prayer Partner reported \$9.35 was made from the District sale of linen from St. Andrew's School in Porto Rico and this amount was sent to Miss Mildred Hayes for use in carrying on her work. The Spring U. T. O. was larger than the Fall offering. The Supply Secretary had a fine report, all branches having had

programs on this work as well as having paid pledges, done sewing or cutting and made donations of second-hand clothing. Also a child at Thompson Orphanage is clothed by each branch. The Recruiting Secretary gave a report of the Church's work at Chapel Hill and N. C. C. W. and of the Student Volunteer movement which is one of the splendid results of this work. A donation was made from the District for the Student Volunteer work. The Educational Secretary reported study classes held by all branches on Building a Christian Nation. Two branches had programs on the five major topics discussed at General Convention, and three branches have had regular monthly programs. There was much discussion of Young People's work which resulted in sending a representative to Kanuga for summer conference, that we might have a capable leader of young people in the District. An interesting and beneficial review of the book, Building a Christian Nation, was given by branch Educational Secretaries. Rev. F. Craighill Brown gave a delightful informal talk on race relations basing his conclusions on his experience with the Orientals in China and with the Negroes in the South. Mrs. Hartzell told about the Golden Jubilee Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary and Miss Easdale Shaw made an appeal for Church women to send their daughters to Saint Mary's.

At the Fall Meeting in Rockingham, officers outlined the work for the coming year. Rev. Frederick Drane spoke on the Forward Movement, emphasizing the crisis in the missionary work of the Church and beseeching Church people to have sympathetic understanding of needs and problems at home and abroad. The special feature of the day was the round table discussion of Auxiliary problems conducted by Mrs. D. D. Taber. Arrangements were made for her to visit each branch in the District during December. Mrs. Taber made a tribute to Saint Mary's School calling attention to the fine women present who had been educated there. Mrs. Baxter Moore emphasized the need of education in every department of our work. Miss Rena Clark made the closing talk leaving us with a feeling of inspiration and the desire to make renewed efforts in the work of extending Christ's Kingdom on earth.

## COMMITTEE REPORTS

### REPORT OF RECRUITING COMMITTEE

Year by year, I feel that we, as an Auxiliary, are learning more and more just what Recruiting means: not only interesting others in Missions but letting the word Recruit enter into our lives and make of us more devoted Christians, giving ourselves to the work of Christ.

Not a branch in the Diocese but has tried to do something along this line during the past year and some reports sent to me by District Recruiting Secretaries have been most gratifying.

I would give special mention to the District of Guilford and the District of Orange whose reports are outstanding. Spray and Leaksville have several young Recruits in Home Mission work, giving their time and talents: Sadie Robertson and Annie Wilson both teaching in Prison Camps among other things. Almeria Gordon is now at Saint Mary's School, but expects to do Mission work. Wade Webb is in training at Mt. Sinai in the order of St. Joseph's. Edwin Bethea of Reidsville, a student at Virginia Theological Seminary, served most acceptably at St. Thomas, Reidsville, last summer. The Church of the Epiphany started and equipped a Community House at Flint Hill, St. Luke's Mission. This District sent a number of young people to the Camps.

The District of Orange reports four young men studying for the ministry: Matthew George, Henry Johnston, Jr., Alfred Lawrence of Chapel Hill, also E. J. Craft of Durham. Martha Dabney Jones is a U. T. O. worker among young people in District of East Oregon under Bishop Remington.

The District of Granville reports two young men now studying for the ministry, Benjamin Brodie and Mr. Sturgis.

The District of Forsyth-Rowan is much interested in Ethel Louise Byerly of Coolemees, who is in training in Philadelphia for a full time Church worker. She is most enthusiastic about her work. This District gives a \$200.00 Scholarship at Valle Crucis School.

Almost all of the branches sent one or more boys and girls to the Summer Conferences or Camps, either Lake Kanuga or to Vade Mecum.

The Summer Volunteer Work was again most successful, two girls from Chapel Hill went to Penland School, where their work was so much appreciated that they have asked for their return this summer. Four went to Amhurst, Va., with Miss Brightsie Savage, who came to N. C. C. W. in Greensboro, selected them and paid most of their expenses. Two went to Dante, Va., where such efficient work was done the year before. All of this was done at a smaller cost than any previous year. The Committee is indebted to Mrs. Challen and Mrs. Lawrence for their help in carrying out these arrangements. We very much hope that this work will be continued, as we have seen valuable results from it in the short time that it has been carried on.

As Chairman of the Recruiting Committee, I wish to say that the branches have coöperated most loyally in this phase of Auxiliary

Work, for which I wish to express my sincere thanks. It has made my duties a pleasure, and I bespeak for my successor the same hearty support.

One suggestion I would like to make to all leaders of young people, and that is to create an interest among our girls in our own Church School, Saint Mary's. We feel that the girls will receive inspiration there that will lead them into the love of work for Christ.

Saint Mary's House in Greensboro has done much to lead our young women into Church Work and it also needs our interest and support.

In these days of stress—our Department of Missions is calling for our best, persons of highest quality, fitness and tested ability, especially for Nurses and Teachers, in the hope that a greater day of Missions is about to dawn. The way of the future of Missions can only be the way of the best. May we pray earnestly that we may share with others, the gifts with which we have been so richly blessed.

#### PROMOTION OF YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK

The Committee on Promotion of Young Peoples' Work has met with a most encouraging response from the women of the Diocese in the past year. Many have interested themselves in young people's activities, becoming counselors to the Young People's Service League, the Girl's Friendly Society, and other organizations of the Church's youth.

The services of the Woman's Auxiliary were offered to the Diocesan Y. P. S. L. through its president and through the Rev. Dan Allen, advisor to the organization.

During the year 1932-33, the number of Y. P. S. L. chapters has grown from 38 to 46, under the impetus of the interest taken by the Auxiliary. Of this number, three were dormant Leagues revived, and five were new Leagues.

This is a fine beginning but it must not be the end! Many Leagues are still in need of an encouraging word or helping hand from an older group. Even where there is a flourishing League, there may be too little communication between the young people and the women

of the Church. A spirit of interest, of interdependence between Church organizations, is an Auxiliary ideal.

Our scope of responsibility has been widened during the past year. No longer have we a "Committee for the Promotion of the Young Peoples' Service League" but of "Young People's Work," which means that we must interest ourselves in all the activities of the young people, and strive to promote them by every means in our power.

### WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE COLORED CONVOCATION

Madam President:

There are nineteen missions in the Colored Convocation. Fifteen of these have, or have had, a branch of the Auxiliary. There are six colored priests and one catechist to serve these nineteen missions. In most of these stations you have a priest and a branch of the Auxiliary. This furnishes a unique opportunity for you to "come over into Macedonia and help us."

Our Diocesan Branch has the regulation organization: President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Educational Secretary, Social Service Secretary, Box Secretary, and U. T. O. Custodian. We have Annual Meetings and make annual reports to the National Branch. We do not have District Meetings.

Our meeting last year was scheduled for Charlotte but Charlotte wrote that they could not take the Auxiliary on account of the depression. The prospects for a meeting this year are not favorable.

We had hopes of having Miss Brown to visit the branches this year but there is too little hope of reasonable follow-up work to warrant these visits as yet in this present crisis.

The main handicap in this phase of the church work, as it is in many others, is the lack of available leaders in the field. There are leaders in our midst who are not available and I think it is the duty of every Diocesan officer to find these leaders and give them the opportunity to do their bit.

I think that the programs of both Diocesan Branches should be inter-racial. Friction can be avoided by understanding, church loyalty, and the development of spiritual fellowship.

Madam President, I want to thank you for your splendid spirit of coöperation that you have shown during your term of office. I want to thank the Auxiliary as a whole for your continual interest in my daughter at Bishop Tuttle. I know that it will please you to know that she is to be the valedictorian of her class and was unanimously chosen by the faculty as the honor student and commencement speaker.

Asking that the Holy Spirit will save us from all error, ignorance, pride and prejudice and that our Heavenly Father may so direct, govern, and sanctify our endeavors that they may reach as far as man is found and praying that we may all labor more abundantly to make known the blessed privilege we have in attaining eternal life, I am,

  - VI. Pray for the work, especially on the first Sunday in May.
- This work is one of greatest importance and with earnest endeavor it need not be affected by the financial difficulties that so handicap other departments of our work.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

In making my final report as your representative on the Women's Legislative Council of the State, space permits only the following brief summary:

Through a study of prison conditions, of farm tenancy, of our welfare institutions, and our juvenile court system, of the conditions under which women and children work in mills, etc., the Auxiliary was led to ask for representation on the Women's Legislative Council in order to help create better social conditions in our State. We have thus been enabled to have a share in enacting into law measures for the promotion of prison reforms, Mothers' Aid, greatly improved conditions for women and children working in mills, laundries, restaurants, and mercantile houses; better marriage laws; the care of dependent, defective, and delinquent children of both races; and most important of all, perhaps, through our efforts this year the Department of Public Welfare has been preserved to the State—a department which, under the inspired vision of Mrs. Kate Burr Johnson, attained to a position of eminence among such welfare agencies

throughout the country, but whose very existence was at stake during the present session of the Legislature. This awakening of public sentiment towards our social problems has been accomplished by the unremitting and intelligent work of the women who constitute the Legislative Council. Their vision of the "new earth, wherein shall dwell righteousness" is far from realized, but they will continue to work for it with might and main; and now that the Church in our Diocese, through its Executive Council, has in the past year taken similar action to that of the Auxiliary by affiliation with the N. C. Council of Social Agencies, we may hope for an added impetus towards the fulfillment of Our Lord's prayer that God's kingdom would come upon earth.

### WORK WITH THE ISOLATED

In giving this final account of my stewardship as Chairman of Work with the Isolated, I am keenly mindful of the fact that much has been omitted that should have been done. This, however, leaves a free field for my successor.

I have visited the sick, given food, clothing, medicine and literature where I found they were needed. Five children have been presented for baptism. The work, as you see, is inseparably interwoven with other departments of our Auxiliary service.

I have not been successful in establishing Home Study Classes, so highly recommended by the Council, though I am convinced that educational work with the Isolated is by far the most important and enduring which can be done.

I place particular emphasis upon the work, for and by the Church at Valle Crucis. For three years we have had Nina Miller, one of our isolated girls, in this school. Each year she has been awarded a scholarship which has defrayed the cost of her board and tuition. Her other necessary expenses have been met by generous donations of cash and clothing made by parishes and individuals in this and in the Western Diocese. It would have been impossible to keep Nina at Valle Crucis but for the whole-hearted coöperation of Mr. Kent and of Rev. Lane Barton of Flint, Michigan.

I have personal assurances from Mr. Kent, Miss Graves and Mrs. Starnes that Nina is one of the finest girls ever entrusted to them. I hope most sincerely that means will be found to enable her to complete her course and graduate next year. I wish that each person interested in this work might see and know this girl as I do. You could never regret any sacrifices made to assist her.

You realize, I am sure, that food, clothing, medicines and literature, necessary as they are, are purely temporal things, but to have a share in the development of body, mind and spirit of "one of these, His little ones," is to share in the realm of things eternal.

## CONSTITUTION

---

### ARTICLE I

#### Name

The name of this organization shall be "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

### ARTICLE II

#### Object

The object of this organization shall be to carry out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church: Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service.

### ARTICLE III

#### Membership

All women of the Diocese, by virtue of their Baptism, are eligible for membership in the Woman's Auxiliary.

### ARTICLE IV

#### Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: a President, a Vice-President, who is also Secretary of the Supply Department, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of the Department of Religious Education, a Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service, and a Treasurer of the United Thank Offering.

Sec. 2. These officers, with the District Chairmen, shall constitute the Executive Committee and shall meet twice a year, at the call of the President.

### ARTICLE V

#### Duties of Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for. She shall preside at all meetings, and at every annual meeting shall address the Auxiliary.

Sec. 2. The Vice-President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have charge of the Supply Department.

Sec. 3. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist the President in preparing and having printed the Annual Report, and at each annual meeting shall make a report.

Sec. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering and Box Work money, and shall make report of same at the annual meeting. At the end of every fiscal year the Treasurer's accounts shall be verified by a public auditor. The Treasurer's report, as audited, shall be published in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Sec. 5. The Secretary of the Department of Religious Education shall arrange two Institutes each year before Advent, one to be held in the Convocation of Raleigh and one in the Convocation of Charlotte, and shall carry out the Educational program provided by the National Council.

Sec. 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service shall carry out as nearly as possible the suggested program of the National Council.

Sec. 7. The Treasurer of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in March and September; and shall deposit same in a Savings Bank, or immediately remit to the Treasurer of the National Council for Investment.

## ARTICLE VI

### Term of Office

Section 1. All Diocesan Officers shall be elected for a term of three years; the President to be elected at the second annual meeting after the Triennial; the Treasurer, Secretary of the Department of Religious Education and Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service the third meeting after the Triennial; and the Vice-President, and United Thank Offering Treasurer the first meeting after the Triennial. No officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms. Vacancies occurring during the year shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Sec. 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President for one year.

## ARTICLE VII

### Districts

(a) For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into Districts.

(b) Each District shall meet twice a year.

(c) A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman, duly elected by her District for a term of three years.

**ARTICLE VIII****Election of Diocesan Officers**

Section 1. The President shall appoint a committee of three at the annual Convention to receive nominations. Nominations may be in writing or from the floor. All names shall be presented to the Convention. If there is no majority on the first ballot, all names shall be dropped but the three having the largest number of votes.

Sec. 2. Any delegate may nominate. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund. No vote shall be cast by proxy. All elections shall be by ballot.

Sec. 3. All members of the Executive Committee may vote independently of their branches.

**ARTICLE IX****Finance**

Section 1. In the fall the Treasurer shall send to every branch the following ascending scale, and each branch shall designate the class which it desires to enter: \$5 class, \$10 class, \$15 class, \$20 class, \$25 class, \$35 class, \$50 class, \$75 class, \$100 class, \$150 class, \$200 class, \$250 class, \$300 class, \$350 class, \$400 class, \$450 class, \$500 class, \$550 class, \$600 class.

Sec. 2. The United Thank Offering, money for the Supply Department, and the Central Fund, shall be in addition to the contributions made according to the ascending scale.

Sec. 3. From the amount contributed according to this scale the Treasurer shall turn over one-half to the Forward Movement Fund, and one-half to such specials as the parish branch may designate.

**ARTICLE X****Amendments**

This Constitution may be amended at the annual meeting of the Diocesan Branch by a two-thirds vote of the delegates, due notice of the proposed amendments having been given to every branch at least one month before the annual meeting.

**BY-LAWS**

The time and place for the annual meeting shall be approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

1. The order of Business for the annual meeting shall be arranged by the President and the Executive Committee.

2. Each Parish Branch having 50 members or less shall be represented by the Branch President and one other delegate (appointed by the President, or elected by the Branch). The President or representative, and the delegate each has a vote. Each additional 50 members shall entitle the Branch to an additional delegate, with power to vote.

3. Each branch shall be assessed twenty-five cents per member, to provide for Provincial expenses, printing, postage, stationery, and traveling expenses of speakers; \$50 shall be set aside from this fund for the President's traveling expenses. All offerings at district meetings and institutes, except when given for some special object, shall be added to this fund, which shall be known as the Central Fund.

4. One-fourth of the branches having the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at the Annual Meeting. Five members shall constitute a quorum at the Executive Committee meetings.

5. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates at any Annual meeting.

# Annual Meeting

## 1934

Aim: "Steadfastly purposing to do His Will."

### Minutes

The Fifty-second Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Diocese of North Carolina convened Tuesday morning, April 10th, 1934, at 11 o'clock, in St. Stephen's Church, Oxford. The opening prayers were read by the Rector, the Rev. Reuben Meredith.

The President presided and called the meeting to order, after which the secretary called the roll.

Mrs. M. C. Taylor extended a welcome to the meeting on the part of the Oxford branch and Mrs. E. A. Penick responded in the name of the Woman's Auxiliary.

*Findings on Discussion*—Mrs. W. J. Gordon, Chairman; Mrs. Ben White, Mrs. R. N. Wilson, Mrs. Baxter Moore, Mrs. W. E. Barnes, Mrs. H. G. Cooper.

The Diocesan officers then made their reports, which were ordered printed in the year book.

At noon, due to the absence of Mrs. Wm. J. Gordon, who was to lead the noon meditations and prayers, Bishop Penick made a short talk and read appropriate prayers.

Mrs. W. M. Rosborough then presented to the meeting, in a stirring manner, the facts concerning the present financial crisis in the missionary work of the Church, quoting figures given to her by the Treasurer of the National Council, Dr. Lewis B. Franklin, and the Diocesan Treasurer for the Church Program, Mr. J. Renwicke Wilkes. These fig-

ures showed the deficit for the year 1933 and anticipated deficit for 1934 to be \$1,000,000.00.

The President then opened the meeting to general discussion. Several suggestions were offered, followed by an appeal made by Bishop Penick to the members of the Auxiliary to spread the information concerning conditions wherever and whenever possible.

Bishop Penick also presented Mr. George C. Pollard, head of the parochial schools in Henderson and Louisburg, who told of the possible hardships connected with the closing of the Negro schools there.

Just before the meeting adjourned for lunch, the President presented to the Bishop a new set of vestments, with the love and gratitude of the Auxiliary. The gift was accepted by Bishop Penick with a few well chosen words of appreciation.

At 1:30 the meeting was adjourned for lunch, being opened again at 2:30 with report by the Credentials Committee of 53 branches represented, 151 delegates present, including members of the Executive Board, making 151 votes.

Elections then took place, Mrs. Ross Sigmon being duly elected Treasurer; Mrs. Theodore Partrick, Jr., Educational Secretary; Mrs. Howard Hartzell, Secretary for Christian Social Service, and Mrs. Baxter Moore as member on the Diocesan Executive Board.

Preceding the election of the other delegates to the General Convention in Atlantic City, in October, 1934, a motion was made that rules be suspended and the President and United Thank Offering Custodian be elected unanimously as two of the five delegates. This motion was seconded and carried. The other delegates elected were: Miss Rena Clark, Mrs. Baxter Moore and Mrs. Theodore Partrick, Jr. The alternates, numbered in the following order, were: Mrs. Wm. J. Gordon, Mrs. Howard Hartzell, Mrs. Ross Sigmon, Mrs. Isaac W. Hughes, and Miss Corrinna Gant.

Mr. Vache made an inspiring talk on Vade Mecum, reporting that an auditorium would be built for the summer season, the foundation and essential parts of the building to be erected at a cost of \$5,000, given by the Winston Foundation. He urged attendance at the camps for young people and for the Auxiliary.

Mrs. Cruikshank then made an appeal for St. Mary's School, asking for co-operation on the part of the Auxiliary members in interesting girls. She reported conditions at present as favorable and prospects good.

In the absence of Miss Williams, worker at the Student Center at the N. C. C. W., Mr. Vache spoke of the work being done there at St. Mary's House.

The following Committee Chairmen made interesting reports: Mrs. E. K. Powe, on Prayer Partnership; Miss Mary Henderson, Legislative Council; Mrs. F. S. Spruill, Recruiting; Miss Claudia Hunter, Work Among the Isolated; Miss Laura Clark, Promotion of Young People's Work, and Mrs. Ben White, Bishop Cheshire Scholarship at Valle Crucis.

Miss Easdale Shaw, President of the Alumnae of St. Mary's School, introduced Miss Katherine Duff, Alumnae Secretary, who told of several ways in which the members of the Auxiliary could help St. Mary's, appealing especially to the many members of the alumnae in the meeting.

At 5 o'clock the meeting was adjourned.

Evening Service was held at 8 p. m., the sermon being preached by the Rt. Rev. Thomas C. Darst, Bishop of the Diocese of East Carolina. Bishop Darst made a stirring appeal to the women of the Auxiliary to take up the fight for victory over the many grave dangers threatening the Church and Christianity today.

At 7:30 o'clock on Wednesday morning a Corporate Communion was held by Bishop Penick and the Rector, Mr. Meredith, with presentation of the United Thank Offering. Prayers were offered in memory of those members who have entered the Kingdom of Heaven since the last Annual Meeting.

The meeting convened at 9:45 with opening prayers by the Rev. John Long Jackson.

Mrs. Hartzell having declined the office of the Secretary for Christian Social Service, over long distance phone, it was necessary to have another election. Mrs. C. E. Anderson was duly elected to fill that office.

The Rev. W. H. Wheeler, Superintendent of the Thompson Orphanage, made a short talk about that institution, reporting 105 children, about evenly divided into boys and girls. He said they all seemed well and happy. He appealed for continuance of collection of Octagon Soap wrappers to pay for part time service of a much needed case worker.

A resolution was passed that the Convention approve the plan proposed by Mr. Wheeler to employ a case worker for part time, and pledged its support of the object in the sum of \$100 for this year.

Mrs. Wm. J. Gordon, Director of the Auxiliary Camp at Vade Mecum, told of the plans for the summer conference, and urged co-operation by attendance, and by the appointment of someone in each branch to promote the interests of all the periods of the summer program, especially the Auxiliary Camp. She also spoke of Auxiliary Day, being Tuesday, August 14th.

The President reported the illness of a former President, Miss Kate Cheshire, and a resolution was passed to have a message expressing love and interest on the part of this meeting sent to her.

On a recommendation made by Bishop Penick, a motion was passed that the President be authorized to appoint Mrs. F. H. U. Edwards, of Oxford, to be the convener of the Negro branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese, to be organized in a manner corresponding with the eight other Districts of the Diocese. The President took this action immediately.

Miss Clara J. Neely, retired missionary to Japan, and the first United Thank Offering worker sent to the field, spoke to the meeting of the wonderful value of the U. T. O., and the importance of the small individual gifts making up the whole. She told of the changes taking place during recent years in Japan and of the establishment of native Church organization, with the influence of Christianity steadily permeating the Japanese life. She told how the work begun by the Christian Churches has been followed and enlarged by government and other agencies. The end of Miss Neely's talk was a touching incident of work among the lepers and of their self-denial in going without food in order to contribute to the U. T. O. fund.

Mrs. Wm. J. Gordon, Chairman of the Committee on Findings from the Discussion, made the following report:

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINDINGS FROM THE  
DISCUSSION**

MRS. WM. J. GORDON, *Chairman.*

- (1) Pledges are lower this year than previously.
- (2) Does the Missionary spirit seem to have lost chief place in the plans of the Service Leagues?
- (3) Recommendation by the Bishop that no specific plans be made, but that co-operation be with the Diocesan plans.
- (4) That the report of conditions made by Mrs. Rosborough be mimeographed and sent to each branch and delegate.
- (5) That each Auxiliary member inform herself as to her own parish quota and see how much has been paid.

(6) That parishes have two treasurers, one for the parish funds and one for funds for Church's program, latter to be paid monthly.

(7) That the Auxiliary officers ask the Clergy to let them meet with the Vestry, and inform them of the facts stated by Mrs. Rosborough.

(8) That delegates from this meeting meet with the delegates to annual Diocesan Convention and arrange a congregational meeting setting forth these facts and arranging some plans to be brought up at the Diocesan Convention.

All who would pledge themselves to follow these recommendations were asked to rise.

The following resolution, offered by Mrs. Gordon, was adopted:

"The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina, assembled in Annual Meeting in Oxford, April 10th and 11th, having considered with great concern the financial situation existing in the National Church, wish to express their anxious interest in the Regional Conference meeting in Raleigh, April 12th and 13th, and their co-operation in whatever plan may grow out of this Conference and be adopted by the Diocesan Convention to be held in St. Martin's Church, Charlotte, May 9th and 10th."

Noonday prayers and meditations were then offered by Mrs. Gordon.

The United Thank Offering presented at this meeting was announced as being \$2,176.73.

The Custodian made an earnest plea that the blue boxes be kept where the owners may see them constantly.

The following resolutions were recommended by the Committee on Resolutions, and duly adopted.

I. That the \$815.00 pledged to the Advance Work be diverted to the financial crisis of the deficit of \$1,000,000 existing in the National Church and an effort be made to increase this amount to \$1,000.

II. That it is the sense of this Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina that the vestries of all parishes and the officers of all missions be requested to adopt and maintain the financial policy of giving priority to payments on their missionary obligations.

III. That the financial budget of the Woman's Auxiliary be submitted to the Executive Board for revision, the action of the Board in this matter to be binding upon the Auxiliary.

The following recommendations made by the President, were duly adopted by the meeting:

(1) That each branch endeavor to send at least one member to the Vade Mecum Conference.

(2) That the Young People's Work (Church Schools and Y. P. S. L.) be made a department with a special Secretary.

The following report of the Courtesy Committee was adopted:

The Courtesy Committee, in behalf of the Woman's Auxiliary, wish to express their appreciation to all who have contributed to the pleasure and comfort of the meeting. In particular they wish to thank the members of the parish, friends of other communions, who have opened their homes to the visitors so graciously; the ladies of the Methodist Church for the delicious luncheons, and the organist and choir of St. Stephen's Church, who have added to the beauty and spiritual uplift of the service.

They specially want to thank the Rector for his gracious welcome and assistance.

They leave Oxford filled with pleasant memories and gratitude to all.

The minutes of this meeting were read and approved, and the new officers duly installed, and, all business having been transacted, Bishop Penick pronounced the benediction and the Fifty-second Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina was adjourned.

**PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS TO THE CONVENTION OF 1934**

*Dear Members of the Auxiliary and Friends:*

Just a year ago you called me to a place of privilege as your President, and today I have come to thank you for all the joy you have given me. It has been my pleasure to attend fourteen District meetings held in co-operation with the Field Department of the Diocese, the Summer Conferences at Kanuga and Vade Mecum, the meeting of the Provincial Synod at Montgomery, Ala., and the crowning privilege of the year was being present with many others from our Diocese at the planting of the Memorial Tree for Bishop Cheshire in The Cathedral close to Washington, D. C. Two meetings of the Executive Board have been held.

A wonderful spiritual privilege was ours in the Day for Prayer held on Armistice Day of last year. It has been impossible to evaluate this remarkable experience, but the quiet peace that came in the silent Church as each woman kept her "Hour of Prayer" will ever be a sacred memory.

The four Educational Institutes held by Mrs. W. J. Gordon have received universal commendation, and all have been inspired and helped by them.

Mrs. R. B. Davis, who consented to finish out the unexpired Treasurer's term, moved out of the Diocese, which made it necessary for her to resign. Mrs. Ross Sigmon, of Salisbury, has assumed the responsibility of Treasurer and has carried on the finances in a splendid way.

The reports you have sent in all emphasize one great need and that is leadership. I beg of you to send your women to Summer Conferences where they can train for that they most need.

We are meeting in a time when our beloved Church is facing the greatest financial crisis in her history and I urge that we lay this seriously to heart. May it be said of us as it is said of Mrs. Roosevelt, "She cares so much that she does something about it."

Our records give us a membership of 2,434 women. My friends, there isn't anything that many women can't do if they prayerfully try, and the irreparable disaster our Church is facing makes it necessary for our women to stand up and be counted.

We all realize that this is a difficult time in which to make an appeal for special gifts; but for love giving is never difficult.

The issue facing is not that of adequate support but of the necessity of closing stations that it has taken years to

establish, work that has been built up through the heroic devotion and sacrifice of countless men and women. I am sure there is not a woman in the ranks of the Auxiliary who will not gladly make some sacrifice, if need be, to enable her to help in this time of need.

Last year is past and we can do nothing more about it, but this year is before us and I recommend for your consideration the following objectives:

(1) That we consider changing the time of the Annual Meeting to September.

(2) That we revise our budget, having two General Church projects, two Diocesan projects, Bishop's Purse, Central Fund and Incidentals.

(3) That each Branch send at least one member to the Vade Mecum Conference.

(4) That we make Young People's Work (by which I mean Church Schools and Y. P. S. L.) a Department with a special Chairman.

(5) That in view of the irreparable disaster that is facing the Missionary Work of the whole Church that we make some personal sacrifice and take some action to help immediately in this time of need.

I do not ask that you make all these changes at once, perhaps you may not approve of some of them at all. I only ask that you consider them and I know that you will decide for the best. Perhaps some of them seem strange and different. Let us remember we are living in a new world—the old one has passed away and we must meet new conditions with new methods, and new ideas. It will take new lives, high lives, lives of hope and purpose.

In answering our Presiding Bishop's call to a Church-wide Endeavor, might we not through such a program find God's purpose for our lives and our Auxiliary in this Diocese?

You remember one day when David was sore pressed and weary he said to some friends that he longed for a drink of water from the well at Bethlehem, these friends at the risk of their lives brought back to him a cup of water from the home of his boyhood. David was so deeply touched by their love that he could not drink the water. It had been made sacred by their sacrifice, so he poured it out into the Lord, and centuries later a woman seeing our Saviour's loneliness and with a woman's instinct feeling that tragedy loomed before Him, showed her sympathy and adoration by breaking her most precious treasure, pouring the spike-nard on His head.

Oh, women, if we could only give what the water of Bethlehem meant to David and what the breaking of the Alabaster box meant to Jesus! Isn't this a time that we can pour out something too sacred for ourselves unto the Lord for "Christ the Son of God has sent us unto distant lands. Ours the ordination of the pierced hands."

### REPORT OF SUPPLY DEPARTMENT FOR 1933

We all realize that the year 1933 was a most difficult one. For this reason it is doubly gratifying to report that in the Supply Department there has been a steady growth and substantial increase of interest. While the needs have been more pressing than ever before, the Auxiliary women of this Diocese have fully met them, showing such willingness and efficiency that we have been able to almost double our quota. We were allotted eight mission fields to which to send boxes. We volunteered for five additional ones—all this due to your hearty support and co-operation. The total value of the boxes for 1933 was \$5,108.44.

Not only is the material side growing, but the Spiritual as well, so that the Supply Department has become a potent missionary force, contributing to the educational and ethical sides of our Parishes. These values might be summed up in the beautiful words of a missionary's wife on receiving a personal box one day in December.

Send gifts to those who follow Him;  
Who in a manger lay."

More use of Parish Houses for Adults and Young People. Better Programs on Christian Social Service, frequently given by professional workers, and the great privilege we had in having Dr. C. Rankin Barnes give an inspiring talk to the District and Local Chairmen of Christian Social Service at Christ Church Parish House, Raleigh.

Another noticeable work is that done in conjunction with the Red Cross Society.

Various branches report special interest in work among Negroes and illiterates.

We are pleased to know that the splendid prison work done by Miss Lilly Hill has received official recognition from the State.

A new phase of work reported is that of the Braille work for the blind.

**REPORT OF DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY, 1933**

All but seven Branches of the Auxiliary reported some educational work during the past year and I want to express my appreciation for the splendid co-operation of Educational Secretaries, especially, District Secretaries who sent out the notices about Auxiliary Day at Vade Mecum, made preparation for the Educational Institutes, and assisted in getting in the annual reports, in addition to their District duties.

Some Branches still only report study classes, but fifty reported programs planned for the year and twelve Secretaries sent me copies of their programs for the year. These were passed on, as a whole or in part, to other Branches that had asked for suggestions.

Four Educational Institutes were held, in Charlotte, Greensboro, Raleigh and Tarboro, by Mrs. William J. Gordon of Spray, in November. The day was given to discussion: first, of educational plans for the Winter and practical suggestions for putting these plans into effect; second, to discussion of the subject for study classes, "Christ in the Modern World." Mrs. Gordon's presentation was inspiring and stimulating and the methods suggested for the study classes were practical, and the unusual interest in the classes, and the enthusiastic reports from all over the Diocese were the direct result of these Institutes.

I would like to recommend, if it meets with the approval of the incoming Diocesan Secretary, that the District Educational Secretaries call a meeting of their Parish Secretaries in August, or early September, to consider the plan outlined by the Diocesan Secretary for the coming year, in order that they may discuss the

subjects, reference material, and the best way to adapt to their particular Branches. I am suggesting this for three reasons: first, all Auxiliary women should think and study about the things for which the Auxiliary is responsible for the year, and about which the Church is particularly concerned; second, some Branches have programs that are not related to the Diocesan plans; and, third, if the work of the Diocesan Secretary is to be effective, she must depend upon her District Secretaries to carry out her plans.

There were only seventeen Bible classes reported in the Diocese last year, and I feel certain that after we have been considering the need of Christian disciples in our modern world, we will make a greater effort to become learners indeed, from our Master, Jesus Christ, that we may worthily witness for Him.

"As Custodian of the United Thank Offering, what is your objective?" To this question I'm perfectly sure I'd voice the dearest wish of myself not only, but of all who have had the blessed privilege of so serving, by answering without hesitation: "That more women may know the joy of giving; that both those who give and those who receive may be brought to a fuller realization that the Thank Offering is no sentimental whim, but a vital force in bringing God's Kingdom on earth." Never losing sight of this objective, I have sought to keep it uppermost.

In a material way I have directed my efforts toward staying the yearly losses in gifts; urging each branch to do even a little better in the present year than in the one just past. In not holding out the hope of reaching the amount given in the triennium ending in 1931, there is no note of pessimism. To work for a goal attainable seemed wisest. It was not reached in 1932, 'tho the yearly loss was lessened. In 1933 four districts showed a gain over the year preceding; the losses of the other four, however, offset the gain. Led by eight determined, faithful district custodians, the branches have caught the spirit of determination and I am confident 1934 will be a turning point. Our women will recognize return of material blessings with increase of gifts. An encouraging note is sounded in the reports of several custodians that *more* women are having a part in the Offering. Dependent on our gifts at present are 112 women in continental United States; 73 in extra-continental U. S. and foreign fields; 41 retired;

and 4 in training. *In* the diocese of North Carolina are five U. T. O. Workers. *From* the Diocese of North Carolina there are six in continental U. S. and two in foreign fields. Remember them with your prayers as well as your gifts.

On October 11, 1934, in Atlantic City our gifts for the three years will be presented. The fall Offering will have to be in on time to be credited on 1934. Just how near we shall come to reaching the amount given at the 1931 triennial depends on our efforts between now and October. There is no limit to our accomplishment if the Thank Offering holds its true place in our hearts. Put the first gift first; pray earnestly that God will put it into the hearts of our women to "give gladly as He has given to them." Our "gifts and joyful service" will surely follow.

A great deal of interest has been evidenced in the Church camps. Warrenton alone sent fourteen people to Vade Mecum last summer and is hoping to send even more this year. Oxford was also well represented. Several women from the District attended the auxiliary camp and came back full of enthusiasm for the work being done there.

We are hoping for more active and earnest work during the coming year.

## DISTRICT OF WAKE

May 3, 1934

At the end of the year 1933 the District of Wake lost its beloved chairman in the death of Mrs. C. E. McLean. We honor her memory and shall endeavor to incorporate in our work the high ideals of faithfulness and devotion to duty for which she stood. May she go from strength to strength and may light perpetual shine upon her.

The reports from the various branches in our District show an active interest in all the work of the Auxiliary. Practically every branch reported a planned educational program for the year and successful study classes or discussion groups during Lent. The outstanding event of the year in our educational work was the Institute conducted in November by Mrs. William J. Gordon, of Spray. This Institute was in preparation for the 1934 Study Classes and was splendidly attended. It was sponsored by our Diocesan Educational Secretary.

The total amount of our United Thank Offering for 1933 did not show an increase over 1932 as we had hoped, but the interest in the U. T. O. is a growing thing. One branch in the district reported an offering from almost every member.

The chairman of our Young People's Work reports a representative in every branch in the District. One branch reports a counselor provided for the Young People's Service League, and another

has served two get-to-gether suppers for the young people. Practically every branch furnished Church School teachers.

The report from the Supply Department shows many garments cut and made and a total of thirty-seven boxes sent, valued at \$635.93, in addition to about one hundred dollars paid into the Diocesan Supply Department.

During the past year the Christian Social Service Work of the branches is again the outstanding accomplishment of our district. The branch reports tell of visits to the penitentiary, the jail, the hospitals, the Soldiers' Home, and St. Luke's Home; gifts of flowers, fruit and scrap books to the hospitals; books, magazines and Christmas boxes to the prisons; food, clothing and toys to Tuttle Community House for the negro children; substantial help given sick negroes; milk for undernourished school children; food, clothing and Christmas cheer to many needy families; the ladies of St. Luke's Home taken on drives and to the movies, also the men from the Soldiers' Home on similar outings; teas given for ladies at St. Luke's, and board paid for two ladies there; a splendid box sent to flood sufferers at Beaufort, a gift to Penland School; a football to Patterson School; children taken to clinic for tonsil operations and looked after, and prayer meetings held for the sick. Each branch clothes one or more orphans at the Thompson Orphanage. Surely our people were never more conscious of the need for Christian Social Service as is shown in the wide scope of their activities in this field of our work. May we become increasingly conscious of the world's need and in the strength of His Holy Spirit may we rise to meet the full challenge of that need.

#### DISTRICT OF ORANGE

In this class study books were discussed and programs planned before being presented to the Auxiliary. We are praying and working that our United Thank Offering may become a more vital part of every woman's life. One branch reported handling more money, one branch reported a gain in mem-

bership, and a third branch reported a hundred per cent enrollment in the Woman's Auxiliary of the parish women.

Intercessory Days and Corporate Communion have been observed faithfully.

At each of our District Meetings, we have had the privilege of having our Diocesan President, and she has already proven an inspiration and blessing to us.

At the Fall meeting, the Rev. LeRoy A. Hahn, of Morganton, spoke on his mission work, which was especially interesting and educational as the Box Work of three of the branches in our District was assigned to this mission field.

Miss Margarhetta Ridgely, of Baltimore, retired Missionary of the House of Bethany, Liberia, was also our guest and told of the wonderful work done in this foreign field.

We were disappointed in not having the Rev. Eric M. Tasman, of the Field Department of the National Council, speak at our Fall meeting, but Mr. Tasman was in our District later and many of our branches had the privilege of hearing him. The Rev. I. Harding Hughes, Chairman of the Field Department of the Diocese, gave the message of the program of the Church in a very forceful and enlightening manner. We had the pleasure of hearing from Miss Margaret Williams, Student Secretary of St. Mary's House, Greensboro. Miss Williams told of her work with the N. C. C. W. girls, and in answering how the women of the Auxiliary could be of service to her, she suggested visiting St. Mary's House, and showing interest in the girls, also donating books for a library. She read a list of recommended books. Some of our women have visited St. Mary's House. A much needed book, the Living Church Annual, was given by one of our branches, also bulbs were sent for the garden at St. Mary's House.

At our Fall meeting, two officers were elected, Mrs. Hugh T. Hovis, Charlotte, Christian Social Service Secretary, and Mrs. Everett F. Croxson, Charlotte, Secretary of the Young People's Work. Mrs. Croxson is filling the unexpired term of Mrs. Brent Drane, who is out of the District at the present time.

Our Religious Educational Department was greatly helped by the Institute conducted by Mrs. William Gordon, at St. Peter's Parish House, Charlotte. She outlined the Study Book, "The Never Failing Light," which was of valuable aid to our branches for the Study Classes.

It is very gratifying that the United Thank Offering for the District showed an increase over 1932, particularly so, as more women are using the little Blue Box. Our ideal is that every woman in the District may feel the need and privilege of helping to spread the Kingdom of Christ by gifts of thanksgiving.

Programs have been given the Box Supply Department and extra work done by some of the branches.

As requested by the Executive Board of the Diocese, the Secretary of the Young People's Work has been listed among our officers.

Many of our branches have done outstanding work in Christian Social Service, but as a District we have not been active. However, under the leadership of our new Secretary, we hope to have a better report in the future.

The Quiet Day of Prayer, November 11th, was observed in the District.

After deducting expenses of the meeting, the Fall Offering was given to make up a shortage in the Valle Crucis Scholarship, which is a memorial to Bishop Cheshire.

Many of the women of our District attend Summer Conferences. We hope for a greater number each year to take advantage of this wonderful opportunity to develop leadership in carrying on our Lord's work in His way.

We feel that our farthest advance has been made along Educational lines. ## COMMITTEE REPORTS

## REPORT OF RECRUITING SECRETARY

I gather from letters received from Recruiting Secretaries throughout the Diocese, that there is a *vagueness* in their minds as to their duties.

There seems a prevailing conception of this work, that it begins and ends with an effort to secure recruits for the Mission Fields.

The dictionary defines recruiting to mean "to enlist for service, to refresh, to build up, to renew, to invigorate." Hence we see the duties of a Recruiting Secretary are manifold.

There are five important objects for consideration:

1. Baptism of Children.
2. The Church School.
3. The Woman's Auxiliary.
4. Summer Camps.
5. St. Mary's School.

The Recruiting Secretary must endeavor to secure the Baptism of all infants, and unbaptized adults not connected with any church.

She must see that the children are enrolled in the Church School, and the adults are members of the Woman's Auxiliary.

It is *not advised* to set aside *occasionally* a day for Church work, resulting in a day of exhaustion, with home duties neglected, but rather that the responsibility be *ever present, daily and hourly*. To my mind, the religious life cannot be separated from practical every day affairs. Day by day must we astutely and wisely seek the diversion of service.

The intimate personal work in a Parish may develop in some one the desire to take the broader step of offering her life for the spread of the Kingdom of God, for an interested woman at once becomes a missionary. Though the joy of a foreign experience may be denied her, there are many true and real missionaries *who never have the opportunity to leave their own Parishes*.

In times of joy or of sorrow a word of help fitly spoken, will yield untold results, be the sympathetic kindly approach to a human being, *made at home or on the street*.

Of grave importance is the securing of boys and girls for summer camps. If necessary, funds may be secured for this purpose through the various church organizations. The Recruiting Secretary should secure and familiarize herself with all available information concerning the camps.

The Dioceses of the Carolinas have a wonderful college located in Raleigh. It should be a matter of pride, *and distinctly a work of the Woman's Auxiliary*, to influence our fine girls of culture, intelligence, and refinement, to go to St. Mary's School.

The Principal, Mrs. Ernest Cruikshank, is a woman of great power, and is both admired and beloved. She has a personal interest in every girl at St. Mary's. The grade A, two year's college course at St. Mary's, is not excelled by any Northern or Southern College, and the honor graduate from St. Mary's, can enter the Junior Class of any of the highest grade colleges or universities, North or South.

I wrote the National Council for information concerning the urgent need for *recruits in the Mission Fields*. A letter from the

Associate Secretary, Rev. A. B. Parsons, gives the following information:

"At present we are searching for a nurse for China, and one for Japan.

"Shanghai asks for ten American women for evangelistic workers.

"Young women are needed of unquestioned devotion, winning personality, and with the very best of educational preparation. They should be sturdy in physique, free from family responsibility or financial obligations here or at home; and they should be prepared to devote a substantial number of years to this work."

May we hope that some young women in this Diocese may be inspired with the love and faith sufficient to be willing to go unto the uttermost parts of the earth, in answer to these calls?

President of Woman's Auxiliary, Members and especially Prayer Partner Correspondents:

Think what wonderful work we here can do for those who toil for Him in far off places by our fervent prayers, by letters to cheer and comfort them, and by gifts however small. Even a card shows thought and love.

Let us take our Saviour's injunction to carry the gospel to all nations upon ourselves, and lighten and brighten the often hard burdens of our Prayer Partners as much as possible. Let us determine to renew our interest in them and their work by frequent prayers, letters and gifts, and let them be assured of the church at home upholding and sustaining them.

Clergymen, missionaries, inmates of hospitals and jails and orphanages have by letter and by word expressed their gratitude to the C. P. C. for these gifts.

As several Clergymen and Missionaries in our Diocese are beneficiaries by subscriptions to church periodicals procured through the C. P. C., it behooves the Woman's Auxiliary to actively contribute to the support of this organization.

Only 35 of the branches kept an accurate report of the many magazines, cards, etc., sent out, but it is gratifying to note that more prayer books and hymnals were given this past year.

The objectives for the work are:

1. Forward your magazines regularly.
2. Pass on good books while they are new.
3. At Christmas and Easter buy one or two extra cards for some mission.
4. Write friendly letters to those to whom you send.
5. Make some regular gifts in money.
6. Pray for the work especially on the first Sunday in May and request your Rector to have a special offering at this time.

### WORK AMONG THE ISOLATED.

Instead of a report this is of necessity a statement of plans for the year ahead.

Who are the isolated?

"Those who are unable to take an active part in the group life of the Church." They may be in rural areas, in towns or cities.

Is there need for this work in the North Carolina branch of the Auxiliary?

"There are over 20 million unchurched people in isolated areas of the U. S., according to a recent government census." There are said to be thousands and thousands of our own Church people in the U. S., almost entirely out of touch with the Church; and it is logical to conclude that scores if not hundreds of these are in our own Diocese—to say nothing of the thousands of the unchurched isolated.

What are the immediate plans for enlarging and intensifying the work in this branch of the Auxiliary?

First, concentration on isolated Churchwomen in an effort to connect every one of them with the nearest branch in some way; concentration on invalids, binding them to the Church in a diocesan intercessory group; and concentration on children, both church and unchurched children.

What is the plan for reaching isolated Churchwomen?

Every branch is asked to work out its own plan. Several suggestions are made to branch presidents as having worked in other dioceses if they have no better plan.

What is the plan for the isolated children?

1. The clergy are being asked if there is a Sunday School they feel the need of starting or reviving and if they need the help of the nearest branch of the Auxiliary in so doing; and the branches are being asked if they can find teachers, prepare them, and send them out regularly if the clergy call on them.

2. To the parents of our Church who cannot bring their children to Sunday School at least once a month regularly there will be offered Sunday School lessons and helps . . . to be mailed monthly for nine months in the year.

What is the first step?

Securing the names and addresses of isolated Churchwomen and Church parents. The clergy and Auxiliary presidents are being depended upon to find all such people in their towns and counties, blanks have been furnished for names and addresses, and their zeal in all good works makes it certain that they can be depended upon for this help, without which nothing else can be done.

### YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK

## CONSTITUTION

### ARTICLE I

#### Name

The name of this organization shall be "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

### ARTICLE II

#### Object

The object of this organization shall be to carry out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church: Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service.

### ARTICLE III

#### Membership

All women of the Diocese, by virtue of their Baptism, are eligible for membership in the Woman's Auxiliary.

### ARTICLE IV

#### Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: a President, a Vice-President, who is also Secretary of the Supply Department, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of the Department of Religious Education, a Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service, and a Treasurer of the United Thank Offering.

Sec. 2. These officers, with the District Chairmen, shall constitute the Executive Committee and shall meet twice a year, at the call of the President.

### ARTICLE V

#### Duties of Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for. She shall preside at all meetings, and at every annual meeting shall address the Auxiliary.

Sec. 2. The Vice-President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have charge of the Supply Department.

Sec. 3. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist the President in preparing and having printed the Annual Report, and at each annual meeting shall make a report.

Sec. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering and Box Work money, and shall make report of same at the annual meeting. At the end of every fiscal year the Treasurer's accounts shall be verified by a public auditor. The Treasurer's report, as audited, shall be published in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Sec. 5. The Secretary of the Department of Religious Education shall arrange two Institutes each year before Advent, one to be held in the Convocation of Raleigh and one in the Convocation

of Charlotte, and shall carry out the Educational program provided by the National Council.

Sec. 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service shall carry out as nearly as possible the suggested program of the National Council.

Sec. 7. The Treasurer of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in March and September; and shall deposit same in a Savings Bank, or immediately remit to the Treasurer of the National Council for Investment.

## ARTICLE VI

### Term of Office

Section 1. All Diocesan Officers shall be elected for a term of three years; the President to be elected at the second annual meeting after the Triennial; the Treasurer, Secretary of the Department of Religious Education and Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service the third meeting after the Triennial; and the Vice-President, and United Thank Offering Treasurer the first meeting after the Triennial. No officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms. Vacancies occurring during the year shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Sec. 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President for one year.

## ARTICLE VII

### Districts

(a) For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into Districts.

(b) Each District shall meet twice a year.

(c) A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman, duly elected by her District for a term of three years.

## ARTICLE VIII

### Election of Diocesan Officers

Section 1. The President shall appoint a committee of three at the annual Convention to receive nominations. Nominations may be in writing or from the floor. All names shall be presented to the Convention. If there is no majority on the first ballot, all names shall be dropped but the three having the largest number of votes.

Sec. 2. Any delegate may nominate. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund. No vote shall be cast by proxy. All elections shall be by ballot.

Sec. 3. All members of the Executive Committee may vote independently of their branches.

## ARTICLE IX

### Finance

Section 1. In the fall the Treasurer shall send to every branch the following ascending scale, and each branch shall designate the class which it desires to enter: \$5 class, \$10 class, \$15 class, \$20 class, \$25 class, \$35 class, \$50 class, \$75 class, \$100 class,

\$150 class, \$200 class, \$250 class, \$300 class, \$350 class, \$400 class, \$450 class, \$500 class, \$550 class, \$600 class.

Sec. 2. The United Thank Offering, money for the Supply Department, and the Central Fund, shall be in addition to the contributions made according to the ascending scale.

Sec. 3. From the amount contributed according to this scale the Treasurer shall turn over one-half to the Forward Movement Fund, and one-half to such specials as the parish branch may designate.

## ARTICLE X

### Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at the annual meeting of the Diocesan Branch by a two-thirds vote of the delegates, due notice of the proposed amendments having been given to every branch at least one month before the annual meeting.

---

## BY-LAWS

The time and place for the annual meeting shall be approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

1. The order of Business for the annual meeting shall be arranged by the President and the Executive Committee.

2. Each Parish Branch having 50 members or less shall be represented by the Branch President and one other delegate (appointed by the President, or elected by the Branch). The President or representative, and the delegate each has a vote. Each additional 50 members shall entitle the Branch to an additional delegate, with power to vote.

3. Each branch shall be assessed twenty-five cents per member, to provide for Provincial expenses, printing, postage, stationery, and traveling expenses of speakers; \$50 shall be set aside from this fund for the President's traveling expenses. All offerings at district meetings and institutes, except when given for some special object, shall be added to this fund, which shall be known as the Central Fund.

4. One-fourth of the branches having the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at the Annual Meeting. Five members shall constitute a quorum at the Executive Committee meetings.

5. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates at any Annual meeting.

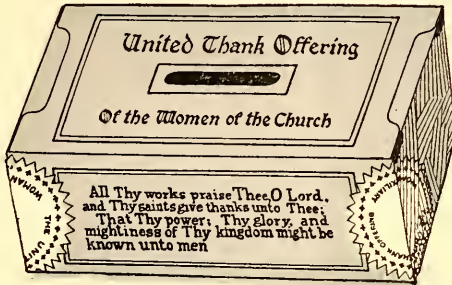

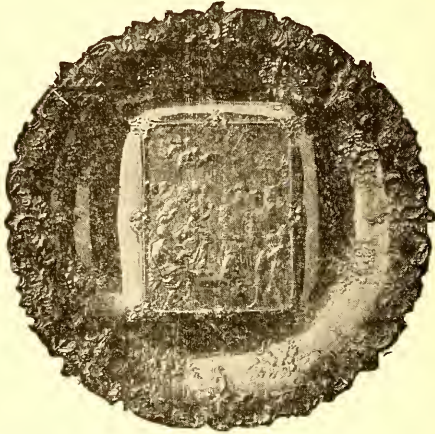

## ANNUAL MEETING. 1935

**Keynote: "Forward Be our Watchword."**

### Minutes

The Fifty-third Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Diocese of North Carolina convened Thursday morning, April 25th, at eleven o'clock in St. Peter's Church, Charlotte. The Rev. Willis G. Clark, Rector of St. Peter's, read the opening prayers and spoke a few words of welcome.

The President presided and called the meeting to order, after which the secretary called the roll.

Mrs. E. J. Wannamaker, Jr., extended a welcome to the meeting on the part of St. Peter's Service League and Mrs. J. B. Cheshire, Jr., Raleigh, responded in the name of the Woman's Auxiliary.

At this point the President presented to Bishop Penick a new set of vestments with the affection and gratitude of the Auxiliary. The gift was accepted by the Bishop with a few well chosen words of appreciation.

The President delivered her annual address, reviewing the activities of the past year, offering recommendations for the consideration of the meeting and closing with an earnest appeal for a deeper, more vital spiritual life, and a clearer perception of the immediate opportunities for service.

The Diocesan officers then made their reports, which were ordered printed in the year book.

At 12 o'clock Mrs. W. J. Bryan lead the noon-day meditations, making a short talk and reading appropriate prayers.

Due to the absence of the Rev. Roma C. Fortune, the Presentation of the 1935 Program was postponed until Friday.

The District Chairman then gave interesting and comprehensive reports, which were ordered printed in the year book.

The Credentials Committee reported 48 branches represented, 104 delegates present, including members of the Executive Board, making 104 votes.

At 1:30 the meeting adjourned for lunch and opened again at 2:30, immediately after which elections took place. Miss Corinna Gant was duly elected Vice-President and Supply Secretary. Mrs. Marion Taylor, United Thank Offering Custodian; Mrs. R. N. Wilson, Secretary of Religious Education; and Mrs. Ross M. Sigmon, Woman Representative on the Diocesan Executive Council.

Mrs. Wilson and Mrs. Taylor declined the offices to which they were elected and Mrs. Ben V. White was elected Secretary of Religious Education, and Mrs. Harvey Hutchison, United Thank Offering Custodian. Upon Mrs. Ben White's resignation, which was accepted by the meeting, Mrs. Isaac W. Hughes was elected Secretary of Religious Education, but declined the office, whereupon Mrs. Cheshire Webb was elected to this office.

At this point, Mrs. S. L. Martin spoke a few words of appreciation for the revised budget and percentage card.

Speaking for Vade Mecum, Mr. Vache urged attendance at the camps for young people and at the Auxiliary conference. He said Auxiliary Day will be August 14th. A Laymen's League Conference is being instituted this year, to be held at the close of the Auxiliary Conference.

Mrs. Cruikshank, reporting on St. Mary's School, stated that this has been a good year and that St. Mary's is in better shape than most Church schools. She made an earnest appeal for the co-operation of the Auxiliary in interesting girls and for co-operation with the Alumnae

Miss Mildred Waddell, Alumnae Secretary, appealing especially to the many members of the Alumnae present, asked for their support of the school and the Alumnae Association.

Miss Margaret Williams, worker at the Student Center at the W. C. U. N. C., told of the work being done by St. Mary's House and of the way in which it is serving the

spiritual needs and need for Christian fellowship among the girls there.

Mrs. Essie Edwards, Chairman of the Negro District, reported that the women in the Negro branches are anxious to participate in the work of the Auxiliary, to assume their full share and to learn. She asked for confidence in them and for instruction for them.

The following Committee Chairmen made interesting reports: Mrs. E. K. Powe, on Prayer Partnership; Mrs. F. S. Spruill, Recruiting; Mrs. Howard Hartzell, Church Periodical Club.

At 5 o'clock the meeting adjourned, the Rev. Harding Hughes reading the closing prayers.

Evening Service was held at 8 p. m., the sermon being preached by the Rt. Rev. Henry W. Hobson, Bishop of the Diocese of Southern Ohio. Bishop Hobson in a most forceful and inspiring address presented the Forward Movement, appealing for an honest facing of facts, an uncompromising re-dedication and enlistment in the cause of Christ.

At 7:30 on Friday morning a Corporate Communion was held by Bishop Penick and the Rector, Mr. Clark, with presentation of the United Thank Offering, given this year as a memorial to Miss Kate Cheshire. Prayers were offered in memory of those members who have entered the Kingdom of Heaven since the last Annual Meeting.

The meeting convened at 9:45 with opening prayers by the Rev. John Long Jackson.

Bishop Penick introduced Mrs. Ethel Louise Byerly Simmonds, a North Carolina girl who has been serving at Cape Mount Liberia. Mrs. Simmonds expressed her appreciation of the way in which the Auxiliary has stood by her.

Miss Olive Meacham, who for nearly seven years has served as principal of the Julia C. Emery School for girls at Bromley, on the St. Paul's River, Liberia, gave a picture of conditions in Liberia, describing with many graphic examples the ignorance and superstition of the people. She told of her school, its 75 baptized children and the religious education given them. The aim of the school is to give the girls a practical knowledge and mastery of the conditions under which they must live when they leave the school. Miss Meacham closed with an appeal to

keep open the work begun in Africa and to keep alive the flame of Christianity lighted there.

Mrs. Wall read the report of the Committee on Work with the Isolated, Miss Claudia Hunter, Chairman, being absent.

The Rev. Roma C. Fortune, interpreted by his son, brought a word of appreciation from Epiphatha Church, Durham for the help given them by the Auxiliary, outlining the history of the work among the Deaf in this diocese, which was begun in 1906, and paying special tribute to Bishop Cheshire, Bishop Penick, the Rev. S. S. Bost, and Miss Tillinghast, who have given it their support. Mr. Fortune stated that there are 101 communicants among the deaf in Durham, 60 outside of Durham, making a total of 161 deaf communicants in the diocese.

Invitation was extended by St. Philip's Branch, Durham, for the 54th Annual Meeting to be held in Durham, April 1936. This invitation was accepted by the Convention.

Mrs. W. J. Gordon, Director of the Auxiliary Conference at Vade Mecum, told of the plans for the summer conference and urged co-operation by attendance. Each Branch was urged to appoint one woman as Vade Mecum representative.

The Rev. W. H. Wheeler, Superintendent of the Thompson Orphanage, made a short talk about that institution. He spoke specially of eight outstanding boys and girls from the Orphanage graduating from High School this year, and closed with an appeal for follow-up work with the boys and girls who go out from the Orphanage.

The Rev. Willis G. Clark followed Mr. Wheeler's talk with a few words of appreciation for the work being done by Mr. Wheeler.

Mrs. Ross Sigmon, Treasurer, spoke briefly about the revised budget and the projects undertaken for 1935, expressing appreciation for the way in which the branches have received the new system of budgeting.

The following resolution were recommended by the Committee on Resolutions and duly adopted:

1. Resolved: That the Social Service Department of the Auxiliary make it a part of their program to "follow up" the boys and girls as they graduate from the Thompson Orphanage.

2. Whereas the year book which comes out in mid-summer is out of date, as to the officers listed in parishes, where elections are held in January, and whereas the year book is published after

all the plans for fall work have been made, especially that of the Religious Education Committee, and whereas the plans and suggestions contained in the year book are of little value to the branches but would be if the officers of the branches were elected in May, following the Annual meeting and had the summer months for preparation and an uninterrupted winter's work: Be it resolved that the parish branches have the same fiscal year as the Diocesan Auxiliary, electing their officers in May following the Annual Meeting.

3. Be it resolved: That the Educational program and the Social Service program be printed in full in the year book.

4. Whereas during the present annual convention much valuable time has been consumed in the election of officers, due to the fact that the consent of nominees had not been obtained previous to the meeting: Be it therefore resolved that Article No. VIII of the Constitution be amended to read as follows: The President shall appoint a nominating committee of three, chosen from the Executive Board, before the Diocesan Convention, and that said committee shall obtain the consent of the nominee before the Convention meets, and be it further resolved that the consent shall be also obtained of those nominated from the floor. Further be it resolved that the candidate receiving the highest number of votes be elected.

5. Whereas one of the most important committees appointed at our Annual Meeting is that of the Resolutions Committee, and whereas it is the last report called for, after many delegates have had to leave: Be it therefore resolved: That the report of the Resolutions Committee be given immediately after the devotional service on the morning of the second day.

6. Be it resolved: That a telegram be sent to Mrs. Partrick regretting her absence from this meeting, also thanking her for her untiring and faithful work as Educational Secretary.

At 12 o'clock noon-day meditations were conducted by Mrs. W. J. Bryan.

Mrs. Wm. J. Gordon, Chairman of the Committee on Findings from the Discussion, made the following report:

#### **REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINDINGS FROM THE DISCUSSION.**

Mrs. Wm. J. Gordon, Chairman.

1. That the President's address opened the meeting with an optimistic note, particularly in her report of the growth of the Auxiliary in the formation of four new branches.

2. That the financial affairs of the Auxiliary show encouragement, the Supply Department making a notable gain of 50 per cent and both the Treasurer and U. T. O. Treasurer reporting an increase. General appreciation of the revised plan of budgeting promises even greater results for this year.

3. That the devotional life of the Auxiliary in its observance of quiet days and days of prayer and corporate communions is inspiring, but that the proportionate number of Bible Classes is very small. In view of the emphasis laid by the Forward Movement Commission on Information, every woman should be enrolled in

some systematic study of the Bible and even greater emphasis be placed on the personal side of religious education.

4. That a forward step has been taken in the appointment of a trained leader for work with young people, and that the Auxiliary has a great opportunity to promote institutes and personal conferences with Miss Cutler.

5. That the district reports show a faithful use of the general Auxiliary program; and that the report of the newly organized Negro District shows a fine spirit of interest and co-operation.

6. That an offering of a gift of life in the past year is an occasion of rejoicing and that the Auxiliary felt it a privilege to share in sending this, our own representative, into the field.

7. That the experience of the elections suggests the necessity of a different method of procedure, and a very solemn consideration on the part of the members of the Auxiliary of the high privilege of service in parish, district and diocese.

8. That Mrs. Bryan opened our eyes with her revealing interpretation of Christ's request for our unused faculties and opportunities in the story of the empty fishing boats and blessed our hearts with the reminder that it is ours to tell everywhere in every need, "Jesus of Nazareth passeth by."

9. That we heard with mingled emotions of rejoicing and shame the stirring life-stories of some of the Father's children in Liberia, told by Miss Olive Meacham. Do we dare not face the challenge she presented of keeping the Light of the World shining in Liberia and the other dark places of the earth—the one really worth while use of our talents, our gifts and our lives? Our \$750 pledged this year will give 15 children an opportunity at Cape Mount.

10. That the interesting and inspiring address of the Rev. Roma C. Fortune on the Church's work among the Deaf in this diocese, made us thankful for the privilege of contributing \$1,000 toward his salary, known as the Bishop Cheshire Memorial Fund.

11. That "our hearts burned within us" when, through the sermon of Bishop Hobson, we heard afresh the Master's call to single minded, uncompromising discipleship; to a life which honestly faces the present challenging need and dependent only upon the unlimited power of the Holy Spirit, goes courageously forward to share in the glorious adventure of rehabilitation; to a life which faces the cross daily, "for the servant is not greater than his Lord," but to a life which has daily the companionship of Him whose own "well done" will be a glorious crown of rejoicing.

Mrs. Simms, U. T. O. Custodian, announced the United Thank Offering presented at this meeting to be \$2,516.02.

The meeting voted a rising vote of thanks for Mrs. Simms, retiring U. T. O. Custodian, and Mrs. George Watts Carr, retiring Vice-President and Supply Secretary.

The following report of the Courtesy Committee was adopted:

"First, this committee wishes to express to Almighty God our gratitude for the perfect weather which has enabled so many to attend this 53rd convention of the Woman's Auxiliary, and for His many other blessings, both seen and felt on every hand.

"We deeply appreciate the cordial welcome and many friendly courtesies extended by the hostess auxiliary and friends of St. Peter's Church; the magnificent address of welcome from the Rev. Willis Clark, the soul uplifting music of both choir and organ under the masterly direction of Mr. William Wall Whidditt.

"To Miss Emma Hall and each of the leaders who have contributed to the great success of the program, to our hostesses in the lovely homes of Charlotte who have extended warm and cordial welcomes, we return sincere appreciation.

"We know that each delegate feels with us that the more often we attend these inspiring conventions, the more deepened our interest becomes."

An additional resolution was adopted by the meeting, thanking the press of the city for their many courtesies.

The President reported communication received from Miss Corinna Gant accepting the office of Vice-President and Supply Secretary, also communication from Mrs. Cheshire Webb declining the office of Secretary of Religious education. Resolution was passed instructing the Executive Board to fill this vacancy.

The minutes of this meeting were read and approved, and the new United Thank Offering Custodian and Representative on the Diocesan Executive Council duly installed. All business having been transacted Bishop Penick pronounced the benediction and the Fifty-third Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina was adjourned.

**PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS TO THE CONVENTION OF 1935.**

*Dear Members of the Auxiliary and Friends:—*

We come in this, our Fifty-third Annual Meeting, to lay another year's labor of love at the feet of the Master, trusting it may be found acceptable in His sight. It was my privilege in company with your other delegates to represent you at the General Convention held at Atlantic City, and I shall ever be grateful for the opportunity of sharing in what to my mind was the greatest General Convention we have ever held. The program was stimulating and far reaching in scope and achievement. We are to make this program ours for the coming three years in the study of Missions, Christian Citizenship and the Life of the Spirit, keeping ever the keynote in mind, "If we be His Disciples." A rich experience was mine in being chosen on one of the Field Teams sent out to tell the story of the General Convention. I attended nine of the District Meetings, Auxiliary Day at Kanuga, the Conference at Vade Mecum, and presided at Auxiliary Day at Vade Mecum, and have held four Executive Board meetings.

The Auxiliary of the diocese participated in the World Day of Prayer and shared in the Day for Prayer on Armistice Day.

It is a great pleasure to report the organization of four new Branches—one at Elkin, one at Concord, one at Asheboro, and one Tarboro. We bid them welcome and to a share in the privileges of service in the Auxiliary.

Mrs. Theodore Partrick, Jr., our Educational Secretary, held four Institutes on Japan in various parts of the diocese, which were enthusiastically attended and which have awakened a deeper responsibility to share the only thing that Japan has not, our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

Miss Laura Clark promoted two Institutes for leaders of Young People's Work, with excellent results, and you will be glad to know that Miss Maude Cutler has taken up this important work since Miss Clark left for China, and I am asking that you give her your co-operation and assistance.

Acting under your permission, our Budget for 1935 was revised and sent to each Branch, and your response has been gratifying indeed. We now have a Foreign project, a Domestic project, and a Diocesan project, and my joy

knows no bounds in the fact that it has all been pledged, because what the Auxiliary pledges it performs.

The recommendations that you accepted last year have all been effected and I am asking you to consider the following for 1935:

*(1) That each Branch pledge support to Vade Mecum and send at least one delegate to the Vade Mecum Conference.*

*(2) That we study the addresses made at the Triennial and include them in your programs.*

*(3) That we endeavor to deepen our spiritual lives and the quality of our Discipleship through prayer, service, Bible study and participating in the Forward Movement, in an effort to revitalize the Church.*

*(4) That we keep the resolution on the United Thank Offering made at the Triennial ever before us in the coming three years and make an effort to give every woman in our diocese the blessing of the little Blue Box.*

I am sure a deep sense of gratitude fills our hearts when we think of our "Gift of Life" in the past year. Miss Laura Clark is now in China as Secretary to Bishop Huntingdon, and what a joy it has been to all of us to share in her going and I feel sure we are keeping her in our hearts and in our prayers.

May I remind you that we are facing unparalleled opportunities in our Church today. Bishop Perry said recently, "We are entering a new chapter in our Church's life. We are entering our hardest missionary field, that of the United States." We are told that the weakness of our Church's work abroad is because of our weakness at home. Bishop Bartlett tells us of the 30,000,000 people in our land with no religion and 11,000,000 children getting no religious training in America today. Unless we give the children a vital religion, what of the future of the Church?

There are nearly a million and a half Episcopalians in the United States and two-thirds of them give not one cent to preach the Gospel or heal the sick, and thousands of others are content to give a weekly offering of not more than the cost of a newspaper, a package of cigarettes or a movie ticket. We have asked people for dollars and cents instead of asking them to take Christ to China or Japan or Liberia. We have closed mission stations, failed in giving sight to the blind and restoration to lepers. O friends, the Cross means sacrifice, if we be His Disciples!

I am asking you to go forward with me this year in a spiritual adventure for Christ and His Church, in giving

our souls and bodies a living sacrifice in prayer and work, for if we work and pray, we will give at any cost.

This year let us really learn to pray and have definite times for prayer for our church, for our diocese, for our parish, for our Auxiliary and for some indifferent person, and for the special objects on our Memoranda. The paramount need of our Church today is more prayer, greater sacrifice, and gladness and joy in His service. Let prayer be a real joy to us and not a duty, and we will soon see things happening! Once the Easter message becomes real to us and we are risen with Christ, we can put joy and power into the Church. Miss Lindley, in her meditations at Atlantic City, asked us to picture what the Auxiliary might be, if it cared so much that it died for the world and if it lived a gloriously risen life, if it gave itself to God our Father in glad service, that we might then know "a blessed passion, a precious death a mighty resurrection and a glorious ascension," and all this is possible if we be His Disciples in very truth.

These are the deeper things of life that I covet for you, my dear friends of the Auxiliary, and I bid you to this high adventure in Discipleship. In this year of our Lord you and I have a message to give and that message is Jesus Christ. Let us bear this message Forward.

**REPORT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE—1934.**

Christian Social Service is the personal and practical application in our lives of the teachings of Jesus Christ.

Fifty-five branches of the Woman's Auxiliary reported doing active work along this line.

Certainly there are social needs in every community; it is not, however, the primary responsibility of each branch to develop a distinct program of its own, but to guide and inspire social service committees to familiarize themselves with the more important community organizations. With a thorough understanding of what these agencies are trying to do for young boys and girls, men and women, there would be no trouble in getting more than adequate support for a social welfare program.

It is difficult to realize the solution to some community problems. It is hard to continue working away on others until success is achieved, but the courage to stay with a carefully laid plan is bound to be rewarded. The paid worker has only a limited time to give in helping to plan ways out of difficulties, while we can give hours.

Organize study groups on Social Service, using such books as "Building City of God" or "Building Family Foundations"—support good clean movies—teach the Bible to Y. P. S. L. Groups.

**REPORT OF DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY, 1934.**

The Educational Secretary begs to report fifty-six branches, representing forty-six parishes, conducting educational work for adults during the past year. In forty-six branches the mission study program for the year was used. Fifty branches held discussion groups, forty-two had program meetings, fifteen conducted Bible classes. Twelve branches had missionary plays or pageants. Sixteen branches had reading clubs and twenty-four had libraries and book shelves. The Spirit of Missions has a representative in thirty-five branches.

The Educational Secretary conducted four well-attended Institutes on Japan in different parts of the diocese, which were enthusiastically attended. Reports coming from the various branches show a deepened interest and clearer sense of responsibility for the spiritual needs of Japan.

Representatives of the various branches attended Diocesan, Provincial and Interdenominational Summer Conferences.

In our Three Year Program we plan to follow the suggestions that grew out of the discussion at Atlantic City, as far as possible.

**REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK-  
DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA.  
ANNUAL MEETING—1935.**

There seems to be very little to report that is definitely Auxiliary Work with young people since my appointment in January. However, I started giving half of my time to the Diocese, under the Department of Religious Education at the first of the year and feel that it is really all the same work.

Three, three day institutes for teacher training have been held, five addresses to parents groups, four one hour teacher's meetings, a ten hour class for teachers and two five hour children's missions and two one day meetings have been held in different parishes in the Diocese. These trips, the preparing of two Diocesan News Letters, and keeping up with quite a large correspondence have filled my time to the brim, but I have enjoyed it all and found it so much more pleasant because of the backing of the Woman's Auxiliary. In every parish that I have visited there have been interested and helpful friends from the Auxiliary always ready to do whatever possible.

I have corresponded with the eight District Secretaries from time to time since being appointed Diocesan Secretary and have heard from most of them, each one expressing a desire to cooperate.

One effort was made to contact every Parish Secretary through the District Leaders with a four point program as follows:—

- 1—A Parish Secretary in every Parish to begin her work by visiting and showing interest in the Sunday School and Y. P. S. L. and finding out as much as possible about each.
- 2—Read the News Letter and try to see that it is in the hands of other leaders.
- 3—Do all possible to awaken interest in the Lenten Offering.
- 4—Work toward a large delegation to attend the Presentation and Pageant for the District.

We are now trying to arrange a meeting of the eight District Secretaries and the Diocesan Secretary in Greensboro to set up a one year program of Auxiliary work with Young People.

My Diocesan time during the summer will be spent teaching in three Conferences and possibly some work in Missions and small parishes in the western part of the Diocese. In the Fall, I shall be on call again to visit parishes and missions where I am needed as fast as I can get to them.

From 1928 until the year just past the custodian for the Diocese of North Carolina has not known the joy of recording an increase in the United Thank Offering. The greatest loss over the year immediately preceding was shown in 1932 when we gave \$989.57 less than in 1931. In 1933 the yearly loss decreased, but the fact brought slight comfort as the Offering was the smallest since 1928. But, oh, the joy of 1934! Determined to "go backward no longer" we came to the close of the year with the glorious gain of \$971.47 over 1933! An increase almost exactly equal to our great loss of 1932.

North Carolina's share in the Offering presented in Atlantic City was \$13,859.22; our percentage of loss being about the same as that shown by the whole church. But 1934 marks a turning point and, please God, we shall leave of the words "loss" and "decrease,"—the Offering to be presented at this convention justifying my prediction.

The Offering of our friends of the negro district is being presented at this convention. We welcome them and look forward to years of service under the same leadership. It is also my privilege to report for the first time Offerings from Elkin in Forsyth-Rowan district, and the Chapel of Hope in Mecklenburg district.

Sometime, speaking of the close of my term as United Thank Offering Custodian, I have thoughtlessly said "when I give up my Thank Offering." Today I marvel at those words. These three years are but the beginning. They have brought to me a deeper love, a fuller understanding, and the firm conviction that there is no dearer way to have a share in bringing God's Kingdom to earth.

As requested I have made an examination of the Treasurer's books for the twelve months period beginning January 1, 1934, and ending at December 31, 1934, and attach hereto schedule showing moneys received during the year and disbursements therefrom together with the balance on hand in total and in each fund at the close of the year.

On Schedule One, I have shown the total balance in each fund at the beginning of the year, the receipts by funds and disbursements from each fund and the balance remaining in the hands of the treasurer at December 31, 1934.

On this schedule, also, we have shown certain transfers of funds which we believe are in accordance with instructions to the Treasurer.

During the year a dividend was received from the Page Trust company amounting to \$234.33. The total amount on deposit in the Page Trust company when the bank was closed was \$1,157.80, so that there is still a balance outstanding in the Page Trust company amounting to \$923.47, but we do not know whether there will be additional dividends on this item. The amount received from the Page Trust company has been allocated to funds as shown on Schedule One.

All cash receipts have been carefully checked against bank statements and were found to have been properly handled and all disbursements are supported by canceled checks.

This statement is intended to be comprehensive of all receipts applying to the year 1934, even though part of the money was not received by your Treasurer until 1935, and therefore could not be disbursed until 1935, but we have attempted to make this statement include all items which apply to the year 1934 even though certain of those receipts and disbursements were made during the year 1935, as will be noticed on Schedule Two.

**DISTRICT OF WAKE.**

The District of Wake reports a year of thoughtful interest and work among all of its branches. If we have nothing noteworthy to report as an accomplishment we know that our women are thinking more deeply of human needs and responding daily to calls from our midst, as well as answering all calls of our regular Auxiliary work.

We started out in the Fall with a very inspirational meeting at St. Gabriel's Church, Selma with interesting reports from the Triennial given us by Mrs. Theodore Partrick and Mrs. W. W. Simms. Miss Bessie Blacknall told us in her sweet interesting way of her work in Nenana. Bishop Penick was with us and urged us to become Summer Conference Conscious if we would grow and become more efficient in our work. As an outgrowth of this meeting the District of Wake gave \$100.25 towards Miss Laura Clark's equipment and passage to China. We sent it with much love and high hopes for her new work.

The features of our work that we think show progress are:—The organization and increasing interest of our young women. St. Hilda's Branch in the Church of the Good Shepherd and the newly organized St. Mary's Branch in Christ Church, groups of young business girls and married women thinking things out in their own way and doing some very fine work. Then we have a steadily growing interest in the work of our Religious Educational Department. All through the District we have planned educational programs at all of our meetings. Our people are really thinking under the able leadership of Mrs. Partrick, our Educational Secretary. Her institute held at Christ Church in the early winter paved the way

for intensive Lenten studies. One Branch in Raleigh has a well informed speaker talk to them once a month, then they have a round table discussion that is very stimulating. One Branch has built up a very interesting program around the subject "Building a Christian Environment." The women of the churches of the Good Shepherd and Christ Church, Raleigh had a very interesting joint meeting when Dr. Elbert Russell, Dean of the School of Religion at Duke University, spoke to them of his personal acquaintance with the Japanese people and first hand knowledge of their problems.

All reports show that our Christian Social Service Department is again active and alive to the needs of our day. All of our branches do their part in the relief work of their towns, caring for the needy, sending boxes to the orphans, visiting the jails and hospitals, and in many cases with the personal touch that shows loving service. We have furnished milk for undernourished children, paid the board for two ladies at St. Luke's Home, and each branch clothes one or more children at the Thompson Orphanage. Heading an appeal from the Associated Charities for 385 Raleigh families dropped from the Federal Relief, the Christ Church Branch gave a Charity Tea that brought in much needed money and clothes for the needy. Other branches in the city helped substantially at the same time. We have given gladly as He has given to us.

We have had deep sorrow and great loss in our District during the past winter. One of our most beloved members, Mrs. Edwin H. Bost of Erwin, whose genial personality and spirit of loving service endeared her to all of us. Our deep sympathy goes out to Erwin at this time. In the going on to the other world of that rare spirit Theodore Partrick, we each and every one of us feel a personal loss that will be with us always. We feel that he was one of those whom God took because "He was made perfect in a little while." Their spirits are with us and will lead us on to increased endeavor for the work of God's Kingdom.

These contacts with our representatives in the lands outside our home land enrich our store of knowledge and prove a stronger incentive to our missionary endeavors. One parish has had the very great advantage of having lectures on Japan by two former missionaries to that country, and all branches report study of the subject. Mrs. Partrick's Institute gave impetus to these classes. Our district was well represented at General Convention, which was a source of inspiration, and we had splendid reports at our fall meeting.

Auxiliary Day at Vade Mecum was well attended, and the Educational Secretary reports "more women attended summer conferences than the summer before." Increased knowledge can not fail to stimulate giving and praying. We believe that some of our branches have caught the vision of real Christian Social Service Uplift, by relieving physical distress, as for instance, the remarkable work of the Clinic at Coolemee, and, too, by entering actively into the fight against juvenile delinquency, by studying Juvenile Courts, and making a map of cases in the city of Winston-Salem. This map was used by a group of men to start a "Big Brother Movement." We are very proud of the gains made in the United Thank Offering in our district last year. It is our aim that more women may know the joy of giving and be brought to realize that the Thank Offering is a very vital force in furthering the extension of God's Kingdom on earth. With this in view our offering should surpass any that has been made during the past three years.

We plan to reach the Isolated of our district; not only our own church people but those not affiliated with any church. There are no doubt scores of our church people in the district who are out of touch with the church entirely and many more who, if given the opportunity, would be glad to form contacts with our church. When I report to you next year I hope much will have been accomplished in this important phase of the auxiliary work.

I hope these plans will go steadily forward, in addition to others now in the making for the extension of the young people's work and the box work.

May I direct just a word to the Diocesan officers? Much of what a District accomplishes depends on the instruction, close cooperation and helpful suggestions made by the Diocesan secretaries. As we are new in the District of Mecklenburg we hope you will do your best to help us.

Mr. Drane from Monroe spoke on some phases of the Church's work in Alaska, and this address prepared us to enjoy more fully a visit in the spring from Miss Bessie Blacknall, one of our much loved missionaries to Alaska, who has now returned to her post in Nenana. Through the kindness of the Rev. Mr. Cheatham, a good many members from our district, and some friends from Monroe, had the pleasure of hearing Miss Blacknall speak in the Village

Chapel at Pinehurst. Pinehurst was the place selected because Miss Blacknall had expressed a desire to see this spot in North Carolina before returning to Alaska. A very nice offering was presented to her, to be used for some work in which she was especially interested, and in addition the Auxiliary in Rockingham sent her a book which she wished to have.

Another outstanding event in our District was the Educational Institute held in Wadesboro for the Districts of Mecklenburg and Richmond, by Mrs. Partrick. Many of our members attended and all came away praising the wonderful way in which Mrs. Partrick conducted this Institute and filled with zeal and enthusiasm to carry out her plans.

For some years we have had in our District a Secretary for Young People's Work, Mrs. C. C. Hudnell of Hamlet, who has done splendid work.

The Rev. Edwin Bethea, who has charge of the Churches in Hamlet and Rockingham, was ordained to the Priesthood in the Church of the Messiah, Rockingham, on April 2nd. As a district we feel privileged and blessed to have been present at this most beautiful and impressive service.

The best work in the district has been along educational and social service lines, but there is progress and a lively interest in all of the work of the Auxiliary, which is most encouraging and makes us hopeful of what can be accomplished in the future.

Yet not knowing they could not do. Since the new organization I have had the most splendid co-operation from all branches. This has been determined by their constant letters asking, "What are we to do?" I shall have to ask you to be patient with us, remembering well your ship has long since and always known a free sailing, ours has just found her sails. Your confidence in us will help to fill them. Hence, at our District Meeting, Saturday, I must ask our President, Miss Emma J. Hall, to make everything clear to those present. Even now, Madame President, I want you to know that you may turn on your Auxiliary's auxiliary, and if to you it has seemed we stopped to mend our nets, we did at times take them up and found therein a catch that gave us to know we were fishers of men.

One branch gave clothes for winter to a family of five. Another clothed thirteen. Another gave hot rolls twice a week to nine old people. Still another clothed eleven children that they might attend school.

## COMMITTEE REPORTS.

### REPORT OF RECRUITING SECRETARY

There seems a prevailing conception of the work of the Recruiting Department that it begins and ends with an effort to secure recruits for *foreign* fields.

The dictionary defines recruiting to mean "to enlist for service, to refresh, to build up, to renew, to invigorate." Hence we see the duties of a Recruiting Secretary are *manifold*.

Because of the appalling lack of funds, the Recruiting Secretaries cannot urge, as formerly, the offering of life for the *foreign fields*, but the task still remains to make *America* a Christian country.

*Domestic* missions began in 1835 when Bishop Jackson Kemper was sent to establish the Church in Missouri and Mississippi. Today the Church has spread her influence into every State in the Union, and yet there are in the United States nine thousand villages with no church, and eleven million American children receive no religious instruction whatever.

We can equip ourselves by prayer and study, *that we may be able to answer the call to go*, *WHEN* funds may be secured for that purpose. At least we can create an atmosphere of *expectancy*, which may make it possible once more to press forward.

There is a custom in non-Christian lands which forbids ordained *men* to carry on direct work with women and children; hence the avenue of approach must be through trained *women* workers.

The Woman's Auxiliary should be an effective agency for recruiting and for securing funds for training our women who have offered their lives. Surely we should see that *means* are provided for the woman who offers her *life*.

Though the joy of a foreign experience may be denied them, there are many true and real missionaries who never have the opportunity of leaving their own State, their own Parishes, or maybe *their own homes*.

Mahatma Gandhi, in a speech to a great gathering of workers, recently said, "I owe, and India owes, more to *One* who never set foot in India, than to any one else,—that is Jesus Christ." That short speech was one of the most vital ever uttered by human lips. Truly our *Christian Churches in India are faithful to their trusts*. In the Diocese of *North Carolina*, there are for the Recruiting Secretary five important objects for consideration:

Baptism of Children  
The Church School  
The Woman's Auxiliary,  
Summer Camps,  
St. Mary's School.

The Recruiting Secretary must endeavor to secure the baptism of all infants, and unbaptized adults not connected with any church.

She must see that the children are enrolled in the Church School, and the adults are members of the Woman's Auxiliary.

*Of grave importance* is the securing of boys and girls for Summer camps.

*The Dioceses of the Carolinas* have a wonderful college located in Raleigh. It should be a matter of pride, and distinctly a work of the Woman's Auxiliary, to influence our girls of culture, intelligence and refinement, to go to St. Mary's School.

The Principal, Mrs. Ernest Cruikshank, is a woman of great power, and is both admired and beloved. She has a personal interest in every girl at St. Mary's. The Grade A, two years' college course at St. Mary's is not excelled by any Northern or Southern college, and the honor graduate from St. Mary's can enter the Junior class of any of the highest grade colleges or universities, North or South.

I have written the National Council for information concerning the need for recruits, and have the following from Rev. A. B. Parsons, the Associate Secretary:

"The opportunities which are before us on the Mission Field never were greater. Evangelistic workers are needed. These should be young women of unquestioned devotion, winning personality, and those with the best educational preparation. They should be sturdy in physique, free from family responsibility or financial obligations here or at home; and these women should be prepared to devote a substantial number of years to this work. It is also desirable that the candidate should have had at least one year's experience in her *chosen vocation*."

May we hope that some young women in this Diocese may be inspired with the *love and faith sufficient* to be willing to go unto the uttermost parts of the earth, in answer to these calls, *and that the Woman's Auxiliary will see fit to finance the venture?*

#### REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN OF THE WORK AMONG THE ISOLATED.

A very real beginning has been made in finding isolated people of our Church. Forty-two have been found; and helpful contacts made, helpful to those who have gone out in the name of the Church and her Head as well as to those sought out. The letters from the branches reporting are packed full of human interest showing touching gratitude on the part of the people visited when they feel that the Church still cares for them; and often impressive loyalty. For example in Albemarle there is a woman who as a little child was reached by St. Timothy's Mission; and who for thirty-three years has been faithful to her church though for years deprived of her own Church services and Sunday School. Will some Auxiliary branch near Albemarle in some way provide this woman with some opportunities of some kind?

The middle of February a suggestion of Bishop Penick's was sent to District Chairmen, the suggestion being to send a duplex postal to all rural families in the various counties seeking isolated Episcopalians and those not connected with any religious body. Mecklenburg, Guilford, and Wake promise real consideration of

the plan; and Calvary Branch members, Wadesboro, District of Richmond are going to ask their Laymen's League to make this a joint project with them.

Holy Trinity and St. Andrews, Greensboro, have to some extent tried the plan, each sending 25 cards to rural families in Guilford county. Among the cards that have been returned to St. Andrews was one from an isolated Episcopal family of eight baptized people showing real interest and asking for Church contacts. (Mrs. Henry J. Thurman makes a valuable suggestion, that in the wording on these cards there shall be the request that the card be passed on if the recipient is not interested). St. Andrew's experience shows the vast possibility this plan has. The Merchants Association, or some group of business men in every community, can furnish a rural list to those willing to try this plan. It will of course cost some money to pay for the postals, 2 cents for every person addressed.

Outstanding work has been done by Mrs. L. M. Carlton of the District of Orange: Roxboro found an isolated Mother with two daughters. St. Philip's Branch, Durham gave a new Prayer Book to this Mother who showed deep appreciation. St. Philip's is also going to furnish literature for the Church School of St. Mark's, Roxboro. Hillsboro reported several families cut off from the Church by distance. Invitations and offers to bring these people to services from time to time were extended. Pittsboro found seven isolated Church people and they were specially invited to services with instruction during Lent, the Rector giving splendid leadership. On Easter Pittsboro is inviting all the Episcopalians of a nearby town to service and dinner later. The Rector has hopes of organizing a Church at this point; and the Pittsboro Auxiliary is offering its aid to eight interested women of the town if they wish to organize an Auxiliary branch.

Some of the ways of bringing these people again into the life stream of the Church being followed according to reports received are: regular visits, offers of a way to get to Church services from time to time, part in the United Thank Offering, special Sunday Schools for them when in sufficient numbers, letters from time to time, sending literature. All requests for literature should if possible be furnished in the district. There is, however, splendid provision made for children whose parents wish and will use Church School helps.

Whenever there is real need for help in supplying clothing this should not be done by the Chairman, or Secretary, of the Isolated but should be reported to the Social Service Department of the Branch.

The question has been asked, "Why is this work almost altogether in terms of rural people? In all the towns and cities of our State there are scattered, forgotten Episcopalians and very many people connected with no Church at all." Surely this is a question which should provoke our thoughtful consideration. Former Attorney General Wickersham of our own Church in an address appearing in a Church periodical about a year ago quoted this statement from a well-known study of crime recently made, "The Churches could contribute much more to the important task of crime prevention if they frankly faced the fact that large groups in every community are outside the influence of the Church." Some of these unchurched people are the responsibility of the Episcopal

Church we will all agree. During the year ahead let us use our splendid powers in bringing into the life of our Church those scattered in rural places and those in overcrowded districts in towns, both our own and our share of the unchurched.

### REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF INTER-RACIAL WORK

The Negro District of the Woman's Auxiliary, under the leadership of Mrs. F. H. U. Edwards of Oxford, N. C., has proven itself capable of accepting its responsibilities by carrying on the work with a courage and earnestness of purpose that is gratifying indeed.

Two one-day Institutes have been held—the first in Raleigh, N. C., at St. Ambrose, September 15, 1934, when thirty-eight delegates representing fourteen of the sixteen Negro branches met. Inspiring reports and generous donations for the Advance Work Fund and the United Thank Offering were received. Also a Discretionary Fund for the Bishop was unanimously voted. Splendid talks and outlines for local Branch study were offered by Mrs. Partrick, Mrs. Anderson and Mrs. Gordon. Mrs. Simms gave an interesting history of the United Thank Offering. At this meeting Bishop Penick impressed the gathering with his explanation of the Diocesan plan and of how the facts leading to this meeting had stretched over a period of twelve years. He cautioned them that their responsibilities would be greater in the future.

The second meeting held in Charlotte at St. Michael's Church, April 27th, 1935, was excellent and the interest in all branches of the Diocesan work keen. Miss Hall spoke of the splendid piece of work being done by supporting an Indian Girls' School. Mrs. Ross Sigmon made a special trip from Salisbury to explain clearly to the members the new budget system which was appreciatively received. Each member of the Branches was given an opportunity to invite discussion concerning Auxiliary Work and its phases which included a conference for the work of 1935. After a stirring address by Miss Hall in behalf of the Julia C. Emery School, Liberia, the District pledged \$50.00 for this School.

Miss Esther Brown, of New York City, arrived in Charlotte early in October 1934 and visited each branch of the Diocese. Valuable information concerning future plans and work was given.

With earnestness and an eagerness of purpose this District offers itself for every phase of the Woman's Auxiliary Work in the Diocese, ever keeping in mind our keynote, "Forward Be Our Watchword."

## CONSTITUTION

### ARTICLE I

#### Name

The name of this organization shall be, "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

### ARTICLE II

#### Object

The object of this organization shall be to carry out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church: Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service.

### ARTICLE III

#### Membership

All women of the Diocese, by virtue of their Baptism, are eligible for membership in the Woman's Auxiliary.

### ARTICLE IV

#### Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: a President, a Vice-President, who is also Secretary of the Supply Department, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of the Department of Religious Education, a Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service, and a Treasurer of the United Thank Offering.

Sec. 2. These officers, with the District Chairman, shall constitute the Executive Committee and shall meet twice a year, at the call of the President.

### ARTICLE V

#### Duties of Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for. She shall preside at all meetings, and at every annual meeting shall address the Auxiliary.

Sec. 2. The Vice-President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have charge of the Supply Department.

Sec. 3. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist the President in preparing and having printed the Annual Report, and at each annual meeting shall make a report.

Sec. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering and Box Work money, and shall make report of same at the annual meeting. At the end of every fiscal year the Treasurer's accounts shall be verified by a public auditor. The Treasurer's report, as audited, shall be published in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Sec 5. The Secretary of the Department of Religious Education shall arrange two Institutes each year before Advent, one to

be held in the Convocation of Raleigh and one in the Convocation of Charlotte, and shall carry out the Educational program provided by the National Council.

Sec 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service shall carry out as nearly as possible the suggested program of the National Council.

Sec. 7. The Treasurer of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in March and September; and shall deposit same in a Savings Bank, or immediately remit to the Treasurer of the National Council for Investment.

## ARTICLE VI

### Term of Office

Section 1. All Diocesan Officers shall be elected for a term of three years; the President to be elected at the second annual meeting after the Triennial; the Treasurer, Secretary of the Department of Religious Education and Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service the third meeting after the Triennial; and the Vice-President, and United Thank Offering Treasurer the first meeting after the Triennial. No officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms. Vacancies occurring during the year shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Sec. 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President for one year.

## ARTICLE VII

### Districts

(a) For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into Districts.

(b) Each District shall meet twice a year.

(c) A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman, duly elected by her District for a term of three years.

## ARTICLE VIII

### Election of Diocesan Officers

Section 1. The President shall appoint a committee of three at the annual Convention to receive nominations. Nominations may be in writing or from the floor. All names shall be presented to the Convention. If there is no majority on the first ballot, all names shall be dropped but the three having the largest number of votes.

Sec. 2. Any delegate may nominate. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund. No vote shall be cast by proxy. All elections shall be by ballot.

Sec. 3. All members of the Executive Committee may vote independently of their branches.

## ARTICLE IX

### Finance

Section 1. In the fall the Treasurer shall send to every branch the following ascending scale, and each branch shall designate the class which it desires to enter: \$5 class, \$10 class, \$15 class, \$20 class, \$25 class, \$35 class, \$50 class, \$75 class, \$100 class, \$150 class, \$200 class, \$250 class, \$300 class, \$350 class, \$400 class, \$450 class, \$500 class, \$550 class, \$600 class.

Sec. 2. The United Thank Offering, money for the Supply Department, and the Central Fund, shall be in addition to the contributions made according to the ascending scale.

Sec. 3. From the amount contributed according to this scale the Treasurer shall turn over one-half to the Forward Movement Fund, and one-half to such specials as the parish branch may designate.

### **ARTICLE X** **Amendments**

This Constitution may be amended at the annual meeting of the Diocesan Branch by a two-thirds vote of the delegates, due notice of the proposed amendments having been given to every branch at least one month before the annual meeting.

### **BY-LAWS**

The time and place for the annual meeting shall be approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

1. The order of Business for the annual meeting shall be arranged by the President and the Executive Committee.

2. Each Parish Branch having 50 members or less shall be represented by the Branch President and one other delegate (appointed by the President, or elected by the Branch). The President or representative, and the delegate each has a vote. Each additional 50 members shall entitle the Branch to an additional delegate, with power to vote.

3. Each branch shall be assessed twenty-five cents per member, to provide for Provincial expenses, printing, postage, stationery, and traveling expenses of speakers; \$50 shall be set aside from this fund for the President's traveling expenses. All offerings at district meetings and institutes, except when given for some special object, shall be added to this fund, which shall be known as the Central Fund.

4. One-fourth of the branches having the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at the Annual Meeting. Five members shall constitute a quorum at the Executive Committee meetings.

5. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates at any Annual meeting.

## OUR IDEAL

*That Christ may dwell in your hearts by faith; that ye, being rooted and grounded in love,*

*May be able to comprehend with all saints what is the breadth, and length, and depth, and height;*

*An to know the love of Christ, which passeth knowledge, that ye might be filled with all the fulness of God.—EPH. iii:17, 18, 19.*

What does it mean to be a member of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council? Taking a mite-box, going to a meeting now and then, sewing for a missionary box, attending an occasional missionary service? Often it does mean just that; sometimes it means much less; but it can mean infinitely more.

Over and above these "practical things" it ought to mean a world-wide view of what the Church of God is sent to do, and a deep and real sense of personal responsibility for sharing in that mission. Do we think of the Church as the Body of Christ, doing the mind of its Head. Are we, as members of the Auxiliary, constantly seeking to learn the mind of Christ, that we may obey it in our own lives and interpret it to others? The question is not so much, What are we doing? as, How are we doing it? Do we work on our knees, doing our work so consciously in the presence of God that it receives His blessing, talking over everything with Him before we try to do it? Do we ask Him always to show us what His Will is, and to empty us of self, that we may be filled full of Him, so that He may work in and through us?

We need great ideals. We need to realize the Christ working in us. We need to commit ourselves to infinite things, and then to put such a spirit into the Church as shall cause the things done to be done in the spirit of Christ. If we all would put the emphasis in the right place it would be a tremendous source of power. Are we, as members of the Auxiliary, vitally conscious that we are sharing in the work of bringing souls out of darkness into His marvelous light? All the religions earth ever had were trying to find out God. No one is wicked because he is a Buddhist or a Hindu. He is only waiting for his answer, and Christianity is his answer. This is our priceless possession, and the world is pleading that we give it to all men. The revelation of God must be given to all men because Christ is praying always that they may know the Father so that they may come back home again. Does it fire our imagination, and kindle our zeal, and deepen our compassion, to realize that our Father's heart is breaking because so many of His children do not know? To this high task we are called. He has planned no other way. He has given us the world

to win for Him. Our hearts ought to sing all the time for joy that He has blessed us with the privilege of being workers together with Him.

Is this what it means to us to be members of the Woman's Auxiliary? If it means this, we shall go to our meetings with our minds and hearts full of the news and needs of the field; and meetings will no longer be dull and uninspiring. If it means this, the sewing for our missionary boxes will not be irksome, for our imagination will picture the place to which each box is going and the people to whom it will bring joy. If it means this, every Eucharist will become a service of intercession in which we join our prayers with Christ's for all the souls whom He has redeemed with His most precious Blood.

Even hours of enforced idleness and pain can be made to count for the Kingdom by prayers, broken and fragmentary though they be, for all those who suffer without relief or hope.

Let us identify our work more closely with the field. All we need is a little imagination to see that making bandages for a far-off hospital is as romantic an exploit as binding up a broken Chinese head. It is all part of the same work. The missionary nurse, moving daily amid sights and sounds of suffering, does not speak flippantly about her mission; yet how often we jest about ours. Is it because we do not realize, or do not believe, that we are all missionaries, the *sent ones* of the King, and not our field but our faithfulness matters?

## A MESSAGE FROM MISS LINDLEY

The end of work coming either after a year or a longer period is an opportunity to measure what we do. Because I always think of the Woman's Auxiliary of North Carolina as one of the branches ready for new and greater efforts, I am using a quotation from Dr. Barry:

"Christianity is the worship of the Father the vision of God as revealed in Christ. For the modern mind this is the crucial difficulty. Nearly all the forces that play upon us conspire to make belief in God difficult. In the old world everyone believed in God: that is perhaps the most signal difference between ancient and modern history. The task of the earliest Christian preachers was to persuade men who believed in God to accept Christ's interpretation of Him. The task of the Church today is almost the opposite: to help people who at different levels and in various degrees believe in Christ to win conviction about God. The revival, and even, it may be, the survival of Christianity in the world today depends on its success in this enterprise."

As I read Mr. Barry's statement I realized the deepening emphasis of the Church's Mission, and because I had had the privilege of watching the work in North Carolina I am daring to use this impressive quotation as something by which the Auxiliary may be challenged anew and may go on to even greater things in the future.

Be it Resolved: That this Triennial Meeting assembled recommend to the diocesan officers of the Woman's Auxiliary that the name of each missionary who has gone out from the diocese, together with that of her home parish and her address in the missionary district where she is serving, with her occupation and United Thank Offering designation, if that be the case, be printed in the Annual Report, or given suitable publicity in order that the women of the diocese may establish friendly relations with her, and

Be it Further Resolved: That it is recommended to these same officers that the dates of furlough and vacation of such missionaries be secured through definite correspondence with them, in order that plans may be made to make their return to their home diocese a pleasant and profitable holiday. If special training is desired, we recommend that information and advice be secured from the Church Missions House in order that they may be guided without loss of time as to the best ways of advancing in their profession or work.

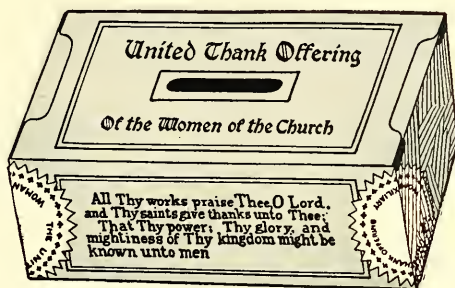

## ANNUAL MEETING

1936

Keynote: "Christ For the World"

## Minutes

The Fifty-fourth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Diocese of North Carolina convened Tuesday morning, April 21st, at eleven o'clock, in St. Philip's Church, Durham. Following the opening hymn and prayers, the Rev. David Yates, rector of St. Philip's made a short address of welcome.

The President called the meeting to order and the roll was called by the secretary.

Mrs. Harold Bird extended a welcome to the meeting for St. Philip's Branch and Mrs. T. P. Thomas of Wilson responded in the name of the Auxiliary.

As a token of the affection and regard of the Auxiliary, a set of vestments was presented by the President to Bishop Penick, who graciously accepted the gift.

The President's annual address followed, in which she gave a resume of the activities of the past year and work accomplished, closing with an earnest appeal for a more zealous missionary spirit and a truer discipleship.

Diocesan officers then made their reports, which were ordered incorporated in the year book.

A recommendation was made by the Treasurer that the budget for 1937 be revised, eliminating the Auxiliary's pledge to Japan, changing the pledge to Liberia to \$500, thereby releasing \$1000 to be used for salary of nurse at Anvik, Alaska. This recommendation was accepted by the meeting.

The noon-day prayers and meditation were conducted at twelve o'clock by Miss Grace Lindley, National Executive Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Bishop Penick delivered his message to the women of the diocese at the close of the noon-day prayers, reminding the women that the primary purpose of the Auxiliary is the extension of the Kingdom of God and warning them that there is grave danger of over-diversification of activities. The Bishop also asked the women to extend their "mothering care" over the young people with special emphasis on their missionary education; to have a neighborly attitude toward the Negro branches; to attend the Vade Mecum conferences for women and to take part in the parochial programs for the Forward Movement.

The Credentials Committee reported 53 branches represented with 125 delegates present, including members of the Executive Board.

At 1:15 P.M. the meeting adjourned for lunch and reopened at 2:15, immediately after which election of president took place. Mrs. W. J. Gordon's name was proposed by the nominating committee and the meeting voted that rules be suspended and the secretary cast the ballot for Mrs. Gordon, thereby unanimously electing Mrs. W. J. Gordon President of the Auxiliary and Representative on the Diocesan Executive Council .

Introduced by Bishop Penick, Miss Grace Lindley spoke to the meeting, opening her talk with a word of appreciation for the place occupied by the Diocese of North Carolina in the general work of the Church. She spoke of some of the characteristics of the Auxiliary and its problems, emphasizing the fact that Christ's way of living is the solution of all our problems and that the Church's mission includes world peace. Miss Lindley reminded the Auxiliary that they should be concerned about the spiritual life of young people, the training of workers for service at home as well as abroad, the work of the Church in rural districts and the financial crisis in the Church. In closing she emphasized that in big things and small, it is not what we do but what we are that counts—"being is more important than doing."

Invitation was extended by Christ Church, Raleigh, for the 1937 Annual Meeting, which was accepted by the Convention.

Mrs. J. P. Watters then spoke in behalf of the North Carolina Churchman urging everyone to subscribe, read and create interest in the diocesan publication.

Reports from chairmen of the following special committees were read: Prayer Partnership Plan, Recruiting, Church Periodical Club, and Work with Isolated.

Referring to Miss Lindley's address, Miss Hall reminded the Auxiliary that while the deficit in the budget of the General Church had been over-subscribed, the fact that the pledges had not yet been paid must not be overlooked.

The President read a letter from Miss Bessie Blacknall, missionary at Nenana, Alaska, telling of the crisis in the work there. In the discussion that followed the reading of this letter, it was agreed that something must be done to send Miss Blacknall a helper. The roll was called and over \$300 was pledged by the branches towards this project.

At 4:45 P.M. the meeting adjourned and a pilgrimage was made to Ephphatha Church, where the Rev. Roma C. Fortune held a brief service, interpreted by his son, Mr. James Fortune.

Evening service was held at eight o'clock in St. Philip's Church, the sermon being preached by the Rt. Rev. W. Blair Roberts of the Missionary District of South Dakota. Bishop Roberts in a stirring address told of his work among the Indians of South Dakota and what the Gospel of Jesus Christ means in their lives.

At 7:30 on Wednesday morning the annual corporate communion was celebrated, Bishop Penick, celebrant, assisted by Bishop Roberts. The United Thank Offering was presented and prayers made in commemoration of the departed.

The meeting convened at 9:45 Wednesday morning, April 22nd, with opening prayers by the Rev. Frank E. Pulley. The minutes of Tuesday's meeting were read and approved.

The president then called for written reports from the districts, which were turned in by the District Chairmen, to be included in the Year Book.

It was moved, seconded and duly carried that notes be sent to Miss Heloise Smith, Chairman of the District of Richmond, and Mrs. F. H. U. Edwards, Chairman of the Negro District, expressing regret for their absence from the meeting on account of illness.

Bishop Penick spoke a few words of appreciation for the Bishop Purse of \$900 given him by the Auxiliary in 1935.

Mrs. Whitmel Webb in a short talk expressed appreciation in the name of the Auxiliary for three years of devoted service given by Miss Emma Hall, the retiring president. A rising vote of love and appreciation was given Miss Hall by the Convention.

Bishop Roberts spoke informally of his work in South Dakota and the part the Woman's Auxiliary has had in it.

Reports on the diocesan objectives followed. Mr. H. F. Kloman, Chaplain at St. Mary's School, Raleigh, made an interesting talk about the school and the way it is building Christian character. Miss Alice Alexander, Alumnae Secretary, spoke for the Alumnae Association.

The Rev. W. H. Wheeler, Superintendent of the Thompson Orphanage, made a short talk about that institution. He reported 113 children in the Orphanage, all well provided for. Mr. Wheeler then introduced Tom Myers, student at the University of North Carolina, who graduated from the Orphanage in 1935. Mr. Myers spoke with deep appreciation of what the Orphanage has meant to him.

Miss Margaret Williams, Student Secretary at St. Mary's House, W. C. U. N. C., introduced Miss Penelope Watkins, member of the student vestry, who told of the aims and work of this student center. Miss Williams then gave a detailed report of her work and the needs of St. Mary's House.

Vade Mecum was represented by the Rev. David Yates who spoke enthusiastically about the summer camps and conferences. He said the Auxiliary Conference will be from August 24th to 29th.

Noon-day prayers and meditation were lead by Miss Grace Lindley.

The president read again Miss Bessie Blacknall's letter in order that those who were absent when this letter was read on Tuesday night might have an opportunity to consider this matter and express their wishes. The roll was called and over \$400 was pledged. On the strength of these pledges, the Convention voted to send Miss Blacknall a message telling her that the women of the Diocese of North Carolina will stand behind her and see that she has a helper.

The budget of \$6600 for 1937 was presented by the Treasurer and adopted by the Convention.

Miss Annie Gray Burroughs, returned missionary from Liberia, spoke most interestingly of the work at Cape Mount, exhibiting bead work, basketry and weaving done by the girls at the House of Bethany.

A motion was made and duly carried to send greetings from the Annual Meeting to the Methodist women in convention assembled in Durham.

Mrs. R. N. Wilson, Chairman of the Committee on Findings, made the following report:

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINDINGS FROM THE DISCUSSION

Mrs. R. N. Wilson, Chairman

1. That the opening hymn expressed the keynote of the convention.

2. That the President's message as always was inspiring, six new branches being a tangible evidence of Miss Hall's devoted service.

3. That in spite of the excellent educational institutes and the systematic study course, there is yet lacking the proper emphasis on Bible Study and Prayer Groups.

4. That Miss Lindley's inspiring messages have given us a new vision of service and challenged us to use the Auxiliary as an avenue for greater service to all mankind, realizing that victory is truly in Christ Jesus.

5. That the Bishop's message came as a timely warning to safeguard the real purpose of the Auxiliary.

6. That the expeditious proceedings of the elections proved the advisability of last year's resolution.

7. That the visit to Ephphatha Church made us thankful for the privilege of having a share in this work. "I will sing and give praise with the best member I have."

8. That there has been repeated expression of our responsibility for prayerful study of the needs of our young people and a determined effort to meet their need.

9. That we feel deeply concerned about Miss Bessie Blacknall in her hour of need and we are determined to send her help.

10. That we are indeed thankful for the work being done in our schools, camps, and orphanage.

11. That from the attractive word picture presented by Miss Annie Gray Burroughs, we find our work in Liberia in a healthy condition and we feel thankful for our share in promoting this worth while project.

12. That Bishop Roberts gave us a re-valuation of our missionary work in terms of Life rather than material objectives. That life, that abundant Life, Christ's gift to us, can and must be given to God's children everywhere. "Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done, on earth, as it is in Heaven."

13. That the intent and purpose of this convention has been, "To know the Truth, and the Truth shall make you free."

The following resolutions were recommended by the Committee on Resolutions and duly adopted by the meeting:

1. Whereas, conditions having been changed: Be it resolved that the incoming president appoint at her convenience a committee to revise and amend the constitution.

2. Be it resolved: That a telegram be sent to Mrs. Bost expressing greetings from this meeting.

3. Whereas, Miss Bettie Gordon has completed twenty-five years of active service in this diocese, serving as missionary worker at St. Luke's Spray, first under the United Thank Offering, then with diocesan support, and for a part of the time as voluntary worker; Therefore, be it resolved: That this meeting go on record as expressing its recognition and appreciation of Miss Gordon's service.

4. Be it resolved: That the members of the Woman's Auxiliary follow our Bishop's injunction that we make a study of the National Programme of the Church and its singularity of purpose.

5. Be it resolved: That some plan be devised whereby the reports of the Diocesan officers and all other proceedings of the sessions may be more distinctly heard by all present.

6. Be it resolved: That more publicity be given the District and Diocesan meetings through the Press.

7. Be it resolved: That the members of the Auxiliary sponsor sympathetically the activities of our young people by exemplifying the Church's mission in their own active Christian living.

8. Whereas, Miss Emma Hall in her wise administration has simplified, clarified and enlarged the objectives of our Auxiliary work, and by her devotion and spiritual vision has inspired us to more consecrated service: Therefore, be it resolved: That this meeting express its deep appreciation of Miss Hall's leadership, realizing that she has truly been among us as one who has served faithfully and well.

Mrs. W. S. Holmes, Chairman of the Courtesy Committee, read the following report, which was adopted by the meeting:

The Courtesy Committee wishes to express their appreciation for the privilege of saying "thank you" to all who have so wonderfully contributed to making this convention a great one.

We wish to thank the parish of St. Philip's for its cordial invitation, its gracious welcome and thoughtful provision for our comfort. To the rector, for his words of greeting; the committee on transportation, for their generous lending of their time and cars; the choir and organist, who made our services more beautiful; the altar committee, for the beauty of the flowers; the sweet young girls who acted as pages:—to all of these, we say thank you heartily.

The setting was perfect for the wonderful program prepared by our beloved retiring President, and to her we express our gratitude, not only for this program, but for her untiring zeal, during the years of her administration, in helping shape our policies so that we feel a distinct advance during her term of office. We thank Mrs. Zachary for her splendid work as secretary.

To our own Bishop, we are indebted for his unfailing support and timely admonition.

We have been most happy to have our National Executive Secretary, Dr. Grace Lindley, and we feel deep gratitude to her for showing us the joy of the freedom of service to the risen, victorious Christ, our Lord and Master.

Bishop Roberts told us interesting facts which made us rejoice that we had had a small part in so great a work through our Domestic Missionary project.

Miss Burroughs gave us a little of the atmosphere of the Liberian project, and we thank her for the exhibition of handiwork, as well as her interesting talk.

The privilege of worshipping in Ephphatha Church concentrated our attention on this miracle of achievement.

For all of these arrangements, we earnestly thank the President and branch of St. Philip's Church.

We would not forget our indebtedness to the local press for efficiently covering our proceedings.

Looking forward to next year in Christ Church, Raleigh, we submit this report of thankfulness.

The United Thank Offering presented at this meeting was announced as being \$2,744.87.

The minutes of this meeting were read and approved, the new president duly installed, and all business having been finished, the fifty-fourth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina was adjourned.

THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS TO THE CONVENTION  
OF 1936

I am filled with mixed emotions as I present this my last report as your President. I have many regrets for the failures and things that I have left undone, but I also have deepest gratitude for all the enrichment of the privilege of working with you, and I wish to assure you the experience has been so deep, so rich and so rewarding, and has brought a joy that will remain with me always. Some one has said that what we most need in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary is leaders, but I feel the great need is followers, and that is what you have been. All the pledges of our challenging program have been paid in full, two appealing specials have been completed, and our United Thank Offering has made a substantial gain.

I attended two meetings of the Provincial Board, the Synod Meeting at Lexington, Ky., the Leader's Conference at New Orleans, La., Auxiliary Day at Kanuga, eleven District Meetings, three Executive Board Meetings, four meetings of the Executive Council, the Diocesan Convention and twenty-five Branch meetings.

The Auxiliary shared in the World Day of Prayer and the reports showed that the Day of Prayer (Armistice Day) was observed throughout the diocese.

I am happy to report six new branches organized and two revived this year, namely: the Frances Hunt Branch at Lexington, Betty Martin Branch at Leaksville, Christ Church Branch at Albemarle, St. Andrew's Branch at Leaksville, Christ Church Branch at Albemarle, St. Andrew's Branch at Charlotte, Chapel of Hope Branch at Charlotte, Business Women's Branch at High Point, and St. Mary's, Speed, and St. Peter's, Salisbury, (Catherine Bourne Branch) revived. We welcome them into the joy of service in the Auxiliary.

The work of our church in Latin America was presented at four splendid Educational Institutes, promoted by Mrs. J. P. Watters, our Educational Secretary, and led by Dr. A. M. Sherman. The offering from the classes on Latin America is to be given to the Bishop of Mexico.

The Executive Board is making a vital recommendation to you in regard to a change in one of our pledges with reference to the work in Alaska, which I wish to heartily endorse.

A resolution was passed at the Synod Meeting that we always use the full name of the United Thank Offering and not the initials U. T. O. Another resolution was passed to ask the editor of the Spirit of Missions to have the August or September Spirit of Missions a United Thank Offering Number, in order that we might use it in our programs before our fall ingathering. A resolution was also offered asking that as Church women we use Christmas cards with a spiritual significance. The resolution passed, that I am sure comes with tremendous import to us all, was a resolution on Peace, asking that Diocesan and Parish officers urge all Churchwomen to spend some time each day in Church or at home in prayer and meditation for Peace, and to join some recognized organization working for Peace. Let us work and pray, realizing that no nation was ever made secure by arms, that preparation for war leads to war, and that it is friendship, understanding and good-will that guarantee peace.

Let us remember that the missionary urge is an inevitable expression of living Christianity and that we have no other end to serve, save the great end of giving the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the world. Missions is the biggest business in the world, but not many understand this truth, or the "King's business" would not struggle along so poorly supported or so harshly criticized. Our task is to clear the way for a better interpretation of the meaning of the Son of God. Let us put the Cross in the place of our question marks and doubts, and follow in the way He leads for

\* "Not only by blue Galilee  
Did He the leper cleanse, the dead  
Raise into life and all hearts  
His matchless glory shed.  
Today He speaks in homes of men,  
To heal each spirit sick with sin  
And at the door of every life,  
He stands and seeks to enter in."

We sing "O Master, let us walk with Thee," forgetting the permission is ours, to avail ourselves is the difficulty. In deep humility let us pledge ourselves in the coming year to pause each day at noon and pray from our hearts, "Thy Kingdom Come."

At the close of an undertaking we weigh achievement against the unaccomplished tasks. Inevitably there is regret and disappointment over hopes unrealized and

tasks uncompleted, but in that way lies discouragement and that is not the Christian way. One who stood in the shadow of Calvary said with sublime audacity, "Be of good cheer, for I have overcome the world," and He, as a citizen of Eternity could say such words because of His divine faith in us. We have not yet realized the fulfilment of His assurance because we are slow to answer His call to service. The challenge of the Church today is more imperative than ever before, the need greater; the menace to Christianity is not denial of God, but indifference and absorption in the material interests which dull our ears and dim our eyes to His summons.

My prayer for us all is that we might, like St. Matthew of old, hear and heed His voice.

"I heard Him say, 'Come follow,' that was all.  
I cast a glance about my tax-booth stall,  
My gold grew dim, my heart went after Him,  
I rose to join Him, letting the coins fall.  
Who *would* not follow, if he heard Him call."

## REPORT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE SECRETARY

## REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

1935

Comparison of the report of last year with the total of activities handed in now shows a healthy increase in almost every activity, with the exception of the reading circles, which fell off in number.

71 branches reported from 59 parishes that there had been 14 representatives sent to summer conferences (this shortage due probably to the necessity of keeping Vade Mecum closed). The Educational Program was followed in 57 branches, reports came of 16 who held Bible classes, 51 program meetings, and 53 study classes. Five branches had prayer circles, 3 had reading clubs and during the summer, 15 produced missionary plays or pageants, 34 had reference libraries or book shelves. Committees or representatives were appointed from 11 branches to help in adult education, 30 to encourage and aid the young people and 27 for the Church School.

The Institutes held by Dr. Sherman on Latin-America in three centers in January were enthusiastically attended and great interest promised in the study classes for this year.

I cannot stress too greatly the necessity for a threefold education in our work towards spiritual development, in devotional

services, in prayer circles, in reading the Bible, the Forward Movement leaflets, and other books along that line, in consecrated attendance at public worship and in encouragement of religion in the home; the historical background of our Church, with the inspiration to be gleaned from the lives of those who lived and died that we might have Christianity today; and the comprehensive knowledge of the present program of the Church at home and abroad, in parish and mission, with its far reaching aim to influence all sides of life towards the coming of Christ's Kingdom.

Surely, if we were to educate ourselves along these lines, the Church, with all of its power for bringing to the world the Life Abundant, would go forward!

These District Secretaries are working through the Parish Young Peoples Secretaries, if this officer has been appointed, if not through the President or Educational Secretary. Two conferences have been held by the Diocesan Secretary at which five District Secretaries and three District Chairmen were present. Two of the Secretaries absent from these meetings have been contacted personally and one by letter.

The *Five Major Objectives Set Up In the Conferences* Are as follows:

1—To further Teacher and Parental Training Institutes in each District.

- 2—To aid in every way possible in sending Counsellors of Young People's Service League to Summer Conferences for training.
- 3—To work toward getting Little Helpers Secretaries appointed in Parishes where there are none, and creating interest in the Work of the Little Helper's Department.
- 4—To further Missionary Education especially through the five Missionary Offerings Little Helpers—Birthday Thank Offering—Diocesan Offering for the Deaf Work—Christmas Box Offering—Lenten Offering.
- 5—To help with finding the isolated children in our Diocese so that all parents may have help in the Christian Education of their children.

When I was asked to fill Mrs. Spruill's unexpired term, as Recruiting Secretary for the Diocese of North Carolina, I found I could not improve on the program already outlined by Mrs. Spruill, so I adopted many of her ideas and sent them in the form of a bulletin to each District Recruiting Secretary. I also wrote a personal letter to them, asking their co-operation in contacting the branches and later, I sent a questionnaire hoping to get a concrete report from each branch secretary.

Out of the eight districts I have had five splendid reports:

They show real achievement and a better understanding of the Recruiting program. Many of the branches say that the questionnaire has definitely outlined the duties of a Recruiting Secretary and that they will use it as a guide for their work next year.

One District Secretary wrote me that "This phase of Recruiting, getting more people interested in His work, for the extension of His Kingdom, in this world must be truly pleasing to Him, and with this thought in mind I have gotten increased pleasure in this work."

I wish I could give you in full the reports of the five mentioned Districts, especially the one from Mrs. Lynn Bernhardt, Secretary Forsyth-Rowan. Mrs. Bernhardt used the questionnaires received from her branches, which was nearly one hundred per cent and in an interesting manner grouped the high lights from each branch in a concise report. May I quote just a few of those high lights?

"A young girl has offered herself for the mission field, and is waiting, hoping to be called."

"We furnished books for a Theological student and were instrumental in placing a young man at Catawba College, who it is hoped will study for the ministry."

"Every member personally contacted and invited to join the Auxiliary, with special emphasis on the younger women, who came in a body and joined."

"A wholesale organization move to recruit children for the church school with gratifying results."

Guilford Secretary reports that they are responsible for one recruit for the mission field and partly responsible for another, and much interest manifested in camps and conferences. One of her branches reports recruits for the choir, which suggests another duty for Recruiting Secretaries.

Edgecombe Secretary reports one branch working up an interest in the church paper, which suggests still another duty for Recruiting Secretaries.

Many of the branches reported soap wrappers for Thompson Orphanage. Dare I suggest that soap wrappers be still another duty for Recruiters?

This report covers about fifty per cent of our branches but I am gratified over the work accomplished. I am sure the other

districts have not shirked their responsibilities and will let us hear from them next time.

I wish to thank Miss Hall and Mrs. Zachary for their interest and patience while getting this program launched. I could not have done it at all without their help.

To the District Recruiting Secretaries, who really did the work, I pledge my support, and ask their continued co-operation.

### REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF WORK AMONG THE ISOLATED

Thirteen branches report 58 isolated persons reached and two families, one of which contains five children . . . a total then of 65 or more persons.

With this as a measuring yard there would seem to be 400 members of this Church in the diocese without any contacts with the Church. Another fact to be noted is that, with one exception, the isolated persons found so far have been found by small, rural branches. The one exception is one of the largest branches in one of the most thickly settled parts of the Diocese. This branch in one item of its excellent report says that 15 Easter cards were sent to isolated people asking them to attend the Easter service in the parish Church. These facts would indicate that isolated persons are within reach of both large and small branches and in the most thickly and the most sparsely settled parts of our Diocese.

For two years your Chairman of this work has hesitated to ask for the appointment of a special parish officer in every branch to undertake this task, because of the feeling we all have against overly organizing our work. It seems necessary, however, if we are really to do this task both of finding and of serving these people to ask for this offer in every parish. And in addition to ask that the Educational Secretary, Social Service Secretary, and United Offering Secretary serve with the parish Isolated Secretary on a committee in order to give these people Church contacts after they are found. For example, the Social Service Secretary might assume the task of supplying ways for bringing people who have no other means of transportation to Church on certain occasions. Hillsboro for example has two members who go six miles whenever it is possible and bring to Church and Sunday School a mother, her five children and two nieces. The Educational Secretary would see that Church literature is furnished and that the names of all children who cannot attend Sunday School regularly at least once a month are furnished Miss Cutler for the Correspondence Course for the Isolated which the Department of Religious Education of the Diocese will be ready to offer in the fall. The United Offering Custodian would be able to give many a woman, who will perhaps never be able to do anything else, the privilege of giving and praying for missions through the medium of the blue box.

The president of one of the largest branches asks for a suggestion of "some practical way in which this work could be started." Last year it was suggested that the most complete mailing list available covering the county in which the branch is located be secured and a return postal be sent to every person on the list asking about church affiliation. This, however, did not seem practical because of the expense. The suggestion is now made that this task might be undertaken jointly by all the women's missionary organizations in the community. This would be another way of working with other Christian women and it would cut the expense and work down one-fourth or more. This seems the only thorough-going way of finding our people. If any branch can think out any other way of accomplishing our purpose, which is to find *every one* which our Church should be ministering to and making of them witnesses wherever they may be the plan will be most gratefully received and passed on to every branch.

May we the year that is ahead do a real task. First let us think our ways to approach this problem, and then act decisively. We are probably at work for a group of our Church members larger than any congregation in the Diocese of North Carolina.

Your chairman last year reported 15 branches of the Diocesan Auxiliary actively engaged in the work of the Church Periodical Club. While there has been an increase since then, it is so slight in comparison to the number of branches in the diocese that one cannot point with pride to the gain made. However, we are glad to report that the work of the C. P. C. in our diocese compares favorably with what is accomplished in other dioceses.

The demand for magazines and books at C. C. Camps and penal institutions is greater than it was a few years ago. In addition to this phase of the work, donors of current periodicals and Church papers to clergymen are secured; Bibles, Prayer Books and hymnals, tracts, Christmas and Easter cards were sent to all parts of the world; and since 1922, a Library Fund to provide missionary workers with suitable books has been provided.

Your chairman recommends that every parish C. P. C. librarian secure information regarding the activities of this organization and present its needs at Auxiliary meetings, and also request Rectors on the second Sunday in May to summarize briefly what has been accomplished by your Diocesan C. P. C., and have an offering to further the work.

With the growing demand for literature and Bibles, we need assistance from branches that are not actively engaged in this work, and assure them that by so doing they will experience the spirit of sharing that brings joy to "those who give and take."

## CONSTITUTION

### ARTICLE I

#### Name

The name of this organization shall be, "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council"

### ARTICLE II

#### Object

The object of this organization shall be to carry out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church: Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service.

### ARTICLE III

#### Membership

All women of the Diocese, by virtue of their Baptism, are eligible for membership in the Woman's Auxiliary.

### ARTICLE IV

#### Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: a President, a Vice-President, who is also Secretary of the Supply Department, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of the Department of Religious Education, a Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service, and a Treasurer of the United Thank Offering.

Sec. 2. These officers, with the District Chairman, shall constitute the Executive Committee and shall meet twice a year, at the call of the President.

### ARTICLE V

#### Duties of Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for. Shall preside at all meetings, and at every annual meeting shall address the Auxiliary.

Sec. 2. The Vice-President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have charge of the Supply Department.

Sec. 3. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist the President in preparing and having printed the Annual Report, and at each annual meeting shall make a report.

Sec. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering and Box Work money, and shall make report of same at the annual meeting. At the end of every fiscal year the Treasurer's accounts shall be verified by a public auditor. The Treasurer's report, as audited, shall be published in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Sec. 5. The Secretary of the Department of Religious Education shall arrange two Institutes each year before Advent, one to

be held in the Convocation of Raleigh and one in the Convocation of Charlotte, and shall carry out the Educational program provided by the National Council.

Sec. 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service shall carry out as nearly as possible the suggested program of the National Council.

Sec. 7. The Treasurer of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in March and September; and shall deposit same in a Savings Bank, or immediately remit to the Treasurer of the National Council for Investment.

## ARTICLE VI

### Term of Office

Section 1. All Diocesan Officers shall be elected for a term of three years; the President to be elected at the second annual meeting after the Triennial; the Treasurer, Secretary of the Department of Religious Education and Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service the third meeting after the Triennial; and the Vice-President, and United Thank Offering Treasurer the first meeting after the Triennial. No officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms. Vacancies occurring during the year shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Sec. 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President for one year.

## ARTICLE VII

### Districts

(a) For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into Districts.

(b) Each District shall meet twice a year.

(c) A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman, duly elected by her District for a term of three years.

## ARTICLE VIII

### Election of Diocesan Officers

Section 1. The President shall appoint a committee of three at the annual Convention to receive nominations. Nominations may be in writing or from the floor. All names shall be presented to the Convention. If there is no majority on the first ballot, all names shall be dropped but the three having the largest number of votes.

Sec. 2. Any delegate may nominate. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund. No vote shall be cast by proxy. All elections shall be by ballot.

Sec. 3. All members of the Executive Committee may vote independently of their branches.

## ARTICLE IX

### Finance

Section 1. In the fall the Treasurer shall send to every branch the following ascending scale, and each branch shall designate the class which it desires to enter: \$5.00 Class, \$10.00 Class, \$15.00 Class, \$20.00 Class, \$25.00 Class, \$30.00 Class, \$35.00 Class, \$40.00 Class, \$50.00 Class, \$55.00 Class, \$100.00 Class, \$110.00 Class,

**CLOSER RELATIONS BETWEEN HOME DIOCESE AND MISSIONARIES**

Whereas, It has been found that there is a wide difference in the methods of maintaining a personal touch with the missionaries who have gone out from the several dioceses, and

Whereas, Some missionaries seem to receive much more personal attention than others,

Be it Resolved: That this Triennial Meeting assembled recommend to the diocesan officers of the Woman's Auxiliary that the name of each missionary who has gone out from the diocese, together with that of her home parish and her address in the missionary district where she is serving, with her occupation and United Thank Offering designation, if that be the case, be printed in the Annual Report, or given suitable publicity in order that the women of the diocese may establish friendly relations with her, and

Be it Further Resolved: That it is recommended to these same officers that the dates of furlough and vacation of such missionaries be secured through definite correspondence with them, in order that plans may be made to make their return to their home diocese a pleasant and profitable holiday. If special training is desired, we recommend that information and advice be secured from the Church Missions House in order that they may be guided without loss of time as to the best ways of advancing in their profession or work.

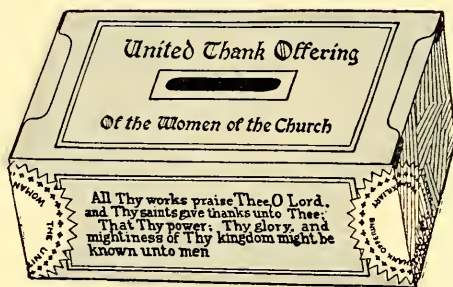

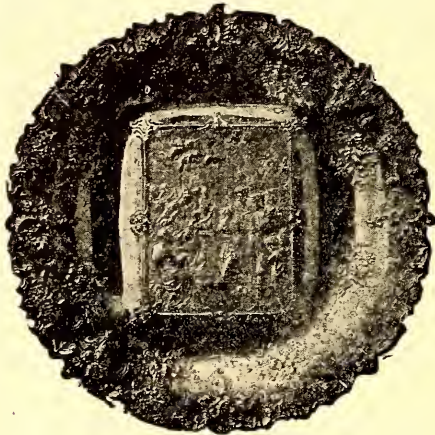

## ANNUAL MEETING 1937

**Keynote: "Workers Together With Him".**

### Minutes

The Fifty-fifth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Diocese of North Carolina convened Tuesday morning, April 6, at eleven o'clock in Christ Church, Raleigh. The president, Mrs. William J. Gordon, was in the chair. Following the opening hymn, the Rev. J. A. Wright, rector of Christ Church, led the devotional service, after which he welcomed the Convention to the parish.

The welcome from the Hostess branch was made by Mrs. Charlotte S. Perkinson. The response by Mrs. Herman Hardison, Wadesboro.

The roll was called by the Secretary. The following committees were appointed:

Resolutions—Mrs. Claude Morris, Mrs. Edgar Hartley, Mrs. W. P. Little.

Findings on Discussion—Mrs. E. J. Wannamaker, Jr., Mrs. U. T. Holmes, Jr., Mrs. B. W. Gaither.

Courtesy—Mrs. Jas. W. Davis, Mrs. W. J. Alston, Mrs. C. H. Herring.

Finance Committee for Ensuing Year—Mrs. Ross Sigmon, Mrs. H. B. Hutchison, Mrs. J. A. Mackie.

Committee on Revision of Constitution—Miss Rena Clark, Mrs. Henry Bourne, Miss Emma Hall, Mrs. Baxter Moore.

Miss Emma Hall, taking the chair, the President delivered her annual address. She said a review of the year showed much reason for encouragement but also called attention to certain needs. She took as the theme of her message the keynote of the Convention—"Workers Together with Him," and as the work is God's, to give and serve acceptably, it must be done His way.

In the absence of Miss Corinna Gant, Vice-President and Supply Department Secretary, the Secretary read her report. The reports of the other Diocesan Officers were made, and accepted, to be printed in the Year Book.

Noon-day prayers were led by Bishop Penick.

Miss Emma Hall made reference to the death of Mrs. Loaring-Clark on Christmas day, and her valuable work in the whole church. A motion was made and carried that a message of loving sympathy be sent Dr. Clark from the Convention.

Mrs. I. D. Thorp, President of the Auxiliary of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Rocky Mount, extended an invitation for the 1938 Annual Meeting to be held in that church. The invitation was accepted with pleasure.

Bishop Penick presented Mrs. Grafton Burke of Fort Yukon, Alaska, who addressed the Convention. She described the physical conditions, food and clothing, the activities of the hospital, the life of the children in her home, and the opportunities for spiritual development. She said there was no unbaptized soul in the village, and expressed appreciation for the help given by the Church Periodical Club and the Supply Department.

Motions were made and carried that messages be sent Mrs. Dorian Blair and Mrs. F. S. Spruill, regretting their absence from the meeting, this being the first Convention either has missed in many years. It was also voted to send Mrs. Kenneth Gant a message of sympathy.

The meeting adjourned for luncheon at 1:15 p.m.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION—APRIL 6

After the Convention reconvened, the Credentials Committee reported 139 accredited delegates—sixty-five branches represented.

After a prayer for guidance in the election of officers, the following nominations were made by the Nominating Committee:

Secretary of Religious Education—Mrs. Lunsford Long.

Treasurer—Mrs. J. A. Mackie.

Secretary Christian Social Service—Mrs. R. W. Ballard.

Nominee for Representative on Executive Council—Mrs. W. Johnston King.

These nominations were accepted and in each case a motion was made and duly carried that the Secretary cast the ballot, thus unanimously electing each nominee.

Elections for delegates to General Convention resulted as follows:

Delegates—Mrs. William J. Gordon, Mrs. Edwin Penick, Mrs. W. Johnston King, Mrs. J. P. Watters, Miss Emma J. Hall.

Alternates: Mrs. Ross Sigmon, Mrs. Watts Carr, Mrs. Harvey Hutchison, Mrs. Baxter Moore, Mrs. Herman Hardison.

A message of greeting from Mrs. F. S. Spruill was read.

Mrs. F. J. Murdoch spoke of plans for celebrating the Golden Jubilee at Thompson Orphanage, a pilgrimage to be made there May 7. She made an appeal for each parish to be represented.

Vade Mecum was presented by Rev. David Yates, Chairman of the Camp Committee. He spoke in an enthusiastic way about the plans for the summer camps and the wonderful opportunities offered there for development—physically, socially, and spiritually.

Miss Maude Cutler, who is Director of the Auxiliary Conference at Vade Mecum, outlined the program for this conference, which is to be July 26-31. She urged that a representative be sent from each branch.

Rev. John L. Jackson, Director of the Kanuga Conference, presented the program for the summer.

Mrs. E. H. Goold gave the history of St. Augustine's College, describing the buildings on the Campus.

Mrs. Claude Morris, Chairman Resolutions Committee, read four resolutions for consideration, action to be taken upon them during Wednesday's session.

Mrs. H. J. MacMillan, President of the Provincial Auxiliary, was presented by Mrs. Gordon. She reviewed the history of the Province of Sewanee, and spoke of the scope of its work. The challenge from each department was presented. She also included a report of the Synod meeting in New Orleans.

At 4:00 o'clock, the meeting adjourned for a drive through the grounds of St. Augustine's College, after which the delegates and guests assembled in the auditorium of St. Mary's School, where through the interest of Mrs. Heriot Clarkson, a United Thank Offering play, "The Joyful Gift," was presented by the Dramatic Club. Later, upon Mrs. Cruikshank's invitation, the women went to the parlor for a cup of tea and to meet the special guests.

## EVENING SERVICE—APRIL 6TH

The evening service was held in Christ Church at eight o'clock. The address was given by Miss Margaret Marston, National Secretary of Religious Education, who gave impressions and experiences which she brought back from a recent trip to the Missions in the Orient. She brought messages of greeting from the women of the church in China and Japan, emphasizing the fact that there is but one Universal Church. In closing, she summarized the call of the Orient to the church in America in three ways—call to understanding, call to co-operation, and call to fellowship. To answer these calls, there must be a renewed faith in the power of God to work out His purpose in this world.

## WEDNESDAY—APRIL 7TH

At 7:30 o'clock, Wednesday morning, a Corporate Communion was celebrated, Bishop Penick being the celebrant, assisted by Rev. J. A. Wright. The United Thank Offering was presented and the annual commemoration of those who have passed into the larger life, in the past year.

## BUSINESS SESSION

The meeting convened at 9:45, Wednesday morning, with devotions led by Rev. J. M. Dick.

Miss Rena Clark, Chairman of the Committee on the Revision of the Constitution, presented the revised Constitution and By-Laws. Each article was presented and a motion made and duly carried that one amendment be made. The Constitution and By-Laws, as amended, were duly adopted.

Bishop Penick expressed his appreciation for the cape and biretta, presented by the Auxiliary. He based his message to the Convention on the 20th Chapter of the Gospel of St. John. He stated that genuine discipleship must be enthusiastic and the great need in the Auxiliary is the warmth, which comes from reality, reality coming from prayer. He urged the Auxiliary to be more interested in our Young People's program, stressing the fact that this is a major opportunity, and that there is a great need for leadership from the adults, which the young people are not receiving.

The Chairmen of the Districts were presented and their reports handed in, to be printed in the Year Book.

In the absence of Mrs. Harris, Chairman of the Negro District, Mrs. Essie Edwards, former Chairman, spoke for this district. She asked for them, better understanding, prayers and confidence.

The following Committee Chairmen made reports, their reports to be incorporated into the Year Book: Miss Maude Cutler, Chairman of Young People's Work—Mrs. C. E. B. Robinson, Chairman Recruiting Committee—Mrs. Howard Hartzell, Chairman Periodical Club.

Mrs. E. K. Powe, Chairman Committee on Prayer Partnership Plan and Miss Claudia Hunter, Chairman Work with the Isolated were unable to be present but sent reports, which were read by the Secretary.

Mrs. Gordon announced that she had appointed Mrs. W. F. Upshaw, as Chairman of the Legislative Committee. Three new Committee Chairmen were appointed: Prayer Partnership Plan—Mrs. Fred Drane; Church Periodical Club—Mrs. Harold Bird; Work among the Isolated—Mrs. H. C. Bourne.

Noon-day prayers were led by Dr. Milton A. Barber.

A letter was read from Mrs. Annie Cheshire Tucker expressing her appreciation for the Ephiphany Offering which is sent her by the Auxiliary.

Reports on Diocesan Objectives followed. Miss Alice Alexander, Secretary Alumnae Association of St. Mary's, reported the school in splendid condition.

Rev. W. H. Wheeler, Superintendent of Thompson Orphanage, gave an encouraging report—stating that the past year was a splendid one in every way. He expressed appreciation for the Easter boxes, and asked for Octagon Soap Coupons to equip a work shop. Reference was made to the Golden Jubilee which has been planned and he urged every one to attend.

Miss Frances Mulican spoke of the work at St. Mary's House, Greensboro. Miss Mary Seifert thanked the Auxiliary for gifts received there, and stated some of the present needs.

Mrs. Gordon expressed appreciation to Mr. Frank E. Pulley, Editor of the Carolina Churchman, for taking care of the publicity and urged the women to subscribe to the Carolina Churchman.

The Courtesy Committee made the following report:

The Courtesy Committee wishes to thank all who have made possible this inspirational Convention—the parish of Christ Church for its gracious invitation; the hospitality committee, and those who have entertained us in their homes; the transportation committee for their time and cars; the United Church for preparing the lunches.

The Choir and organist for the lovely music; the pages for their excellent service; the Altar Guild who so beautifully arranged the flowers; St. Augustine's College for the interesting tour; St. Mary's School for the lovely pageant and Tea; the local press for so efficiently covering our Annual Meeting; Our Bishop, Mr. Wright and our president, Mrs. Gordon, for such a wonderful program.

The speakers, who gave us such interesting and valued information to take back to our branches that we may carry on this work in a better way.

To everybody, again we say "Thank you."

The United Thank Offering presented at this meeting was announced as \$3,095.81, the largest offering for four years for one season.

The following resolutions were recommended by the Committee on Resolutions and duly adopted:

1. Be it resolved: That the time of the Annual Meeting be changed from April to a convenient date in January.

2. Be it resolved: That the resolution passed at the Annual Meeting in 1935, calling for the election of Branch officers in May, be rescinded.

3. Resolved: That the Finance Committee be and is hereby authorized and empowered to expend \$1,000 of the balance remaining in the Treasury at the close of the fiscal year 1936, according to its discretion and judgment, after consulting with the Bishop of the Diocese.

4. Resolved: That in the home mission field we work especially for a spiritual awakening in the homes of the diocese.

5. Resolved: That this Convention endorse our president's inspired message that we measure our activities according to our understanding of God's Word.

Mrs. E. J. Wannamaker, Jr., Chairman of the Committee on Findings, made the following report:

### REPORT OF FINDINGS COMMITTEE

1. That our President, Mrs. Gordon, brought us encouraging news of an increase in the membership, interest and gifts of the Auxiliary and showed us challenging possibilities for still further growth and for making the spirit of sacrifice the measure of our giving.

2. That there is need for continual study and religious education and that everyone should be familiar with the Year Book.

3. That Mrs. Burke's graphic account of the work at Fort Yukon radiated the spirit of joyful service and made us more deeply grateful than ever for the outstanding work of her and her husband.

4. That we should give careful consideration to the methods of raising Auxiliary funds in order that we should do nothing to invite criticism or keep anyone out of the Auxiliary.

5. That Mrs. MacMillan called us to think of the church in wider terms than that of our own parish or diocese and to remember that our first duty is to share Christ.

6. That we should have a justifiable pride in our schools, camps and conferences and that it is to our great advantage to patronize them.

7. That Miss Marston brought us good news of excellent work by native clergy in the Far East, that she made us feel very deeply the fellowship of the Christian family around the world and that we are convinced of the truth of the Japanese student's statement as quoted by her: "The only way out of the present world turmoil is in the footsteps of Jesus Christ."

8. That we must strengthen our auxiliary work by encouraging our parish leaders to get further training, especially by attending summer conferences.

9. That the play given at St. Mary's was a striking illustration of an unusually good way to create interest in the United Thank Offering, and that we should make every effort in the few remaining months of this triennium to secure the participation of every church woman in this offering.

10. That the great festival to be held at the Thompson Orphanage is to be a most inspiring occasion and that everyone possible should avail themselves of this opportunity to see the splendid work there.

11. That from the Gospel for Easter Day, Bishop Penick held up for us several searching tests by which we distinguish between nominal and genuine discipleship. That he put his finger on the greatest need as well as the greatest opportunity in our auxiliary work when he urged us to investigate our young people's work and to give them the right example and wise guidance.

12. That Mrs. Edwards brought us an illuminating message from the Negro District.

13. That a spirit of unusual enthusiasm and spirituality has pervaded this entire meeting which fact we believe indicative of the growing interest of individuals in the Master's business, due largely to the influence of the Forward Movement.

The budget of \$6,600 for 1938 was presented by the Treasurer and accepted by the Convention.

The minutes of the meeting were read and approved, and the new officers installed. Bishop Penick pronounced the benediction and the fifty-fifth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina was adjourned.

## The Bishop's Charge

---

This Fifty-fifth Annual Report of the Woman's Auxiliary is a simple, factual record of a year's work well done. It glances backward only long enough to recite a remarkable achievement. As a Handbook, it is almost indispensable for purposes of reference and study. Its chief value, however, is not its history so much as its vision of work that remains to be done. Like St. Paul, the Auxiliary is forever "pressing forward" towards new marks of attainment for Christ. This eagerness of spirit has prompted the Auxiliary to place a fresh valuation upon the possibilities of youth in our Church. If any one objective for the near future may be singled out for special, urgent emphasis, I believe it would be the moral and spiritual needs of our young people. Youth's spontaneity is a glorious gift, but it seldom becomes effective for the Church except under the wise and sympathetic direction of its elders. This, I would say, is at present the most important phase of the Auxiliary's many-sided program. I anticipate for the women of this Diocese, who are so dead-in-earnest about their discipleship, the same degree of success in this endeavor that has marked their other efforts, first to acquire, and then to share, "the unsearchable riches of Christ."

## THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS TO THE CONVENTION OF 1937

Bishop Penick, Gentlemen of the Clergy, Women of the Auxiliary:

I, too, am happy to greet you here this morning. We are gathered together to give an account of our stewardship for the past year, and to plan to go forward into a new year. I pray that this may not be merely another meeting, because it is the time and the custom for delegates to assemble, but that it may be an occasion when the Holy Spirit is present in such reality and power that we may return to our home with a deepened knowledge of God's will for us as disciples, and with an increased assurance that whatever He is calling us to be, and to do, *is possible*, but possible only as we work together with Him.

A review of the past year gives reason for encouragement. The branch reports show, on the whole, an increase in membership, in interest and in gifts. In referring to the membership, I should like to call your attention to the fact that though there are 108 branches, they are located in only 92 of the 122 parishes and missions of the diocese. I suggest that the districts make a study of this situation, as it concerns the work of the Church within their respective boundaries. Two new branches were organized during the year.

I shall refer only briefly to the general activities of the past year as the reports of the diocesan officers and special committee chairman will cover these in detail. The study for the winter, "Africa," and "The American Negro" has been done in an exceptionally fine way. The approach has been almost surprisingly sympathetic, and the numbers of the programs in the white branches when members of the colored race have made valuable contributions, is a matter of much encouragement. Both races realize that we have a problem, a problem which can be solved only by a Christian attitude between fellow citizens of the Commonwealth and of the Kingdom of God. The increase in the United Thank Offering is another reason for thanksgiving.

In addition to the usual program for the year, the Auxiliary had a Quiet Day in the fall, and four conferences on Personal Religion, in as many places, the first week in Lent, in an effort to emphasize the devotional

life. However, there were fewer corporate communions and intercessory days among the branches and I ask you to consider this a serious loss on our part. Most of the branches observed the Quiet Day for Prayer, November 11, and shared in the World Day of Prayer, the first Friday in Lent. I ask each branch next year to arrange to take part in this World Prayer Day. It is a source of inspiration to be a part of the mighty host offering prayer throughout the world, and during the twenty-four hours of the day. It is also an opportunity for very real fellowship among our communions.

We have been glad to feel that we have had a very real part in the work in Alaska, through the ministry of Miss Gayle Wagner at Anvik and Miss Marguerite Bartberger at Nenana. Our own workers in the field have been increased by Miss Mary Frances Young, of Henderson, who is stationed at the Mission School for Orphan Children at Charlottesville, Va. While a student at the Woman's College at Greensboro, Miss Young gained some practical experience by assisting in the children's work at the Church of the Redeemer.

My own activities have included attendance at three Auxiliary Executive Board meetings, two Diocesan Executive Council meetings, three meetings of the Vade Mecum Camp Committee, two meetings of the Provincial Executive Board and the Provincial meeting in New Orleans, the Quiet Day at Burlington and Auxiliary Day at Kanuga; ten District meetings and ten Branch meetings, at all of which I took some part on the program. I have held one Educational Institute, and four conferences on Personal Religion, and I taught the Auxiliary Course at the St. Augustine's Summer Conference. Outside the diocese, I taught a course at Kanuga Adult Conference, and held a six-hour Auxiliary Institute in Christ Church, Greenville, S. C., addressed the Auxiliary of the Church of the Epiphany, Danville, Va., and made two addresses to Auxiliary groups, gathered at the Church of the Redemption, Philadelphia.

Our thoughts are turning to the Triennial Meeting and the General Convention to be held in October. The theme will be "The Mission of the Church"—the one great life purpose of individuals and of Christian organizations. I hope we may get our thoughts away from the colorful pageantry and even the marvelously inspiring personnel gathered for these occasions to the single-

minded consideration of our common task, the King's business. That, too, is the one reason for our gathering here, today.

We shall lift up our eyes during these two days and look on the fields—on the field of the Province of Sewanee with some echoes of the gathering in New Orleans, last November; to the snow-swept field of Alaska with its heroic consecration and deeply personal association; to the larger, colorful, challenging field of the Orient, with its unlimited possibilities; and we expect from our Bishop such an appraisal of our work as shall make it more effective. Yet it is not our work, but God's work in which He is giving us the privilege of serving, workers together with the Servant of all. We can have no more significant or comprehensive prayer than the response to the "Litany of the Disciples' Way," "Help us, O Master, to walk in Thy way." St. John narrates that on the day following the feeding of the 5,000, the multitudes asked Jesus? "What shall we do that we might work the works of God?" And Jesus answered and said unto them, "This is the work of God that ye believe on Him whom He hath sent." He says that to us, too. It is not enough that we shall be busy doing things; it is important, first of all, that our faith in Christ shall be of such personal reality and our lives so attuned to His, that His own abundant life shall motivate and empower our worship, our gifts and our service; not what we do, but what He shall do through us, counts. If we are to be "Workers together with Him," our methods and our efforts must aspire to His high plane; we would not pull Him down to ours. I am constrained to ask that we think, in terms of this co-partnership, of some of the methods which we use in raising Auxiliary funds. To secure a certain amount of money is not of first importance; the grace and glory of giving lies in the fact that the gift is acceptable to God. The three-fold offering of the Wise Men made one complete gift; mere gold was not enough, the myrrh of sacrifice made the gift precious and brought blessing to the giver, for there is a "mystic enrichment in gifts that cost;" "and the frankincense breathed glory to God. Not the amount of the gold, but the spirit of sacrifice and the assurance that this is "to the glory of God," is the measure of our gift. Not according to our energy, but according to our faith, shall there flow from our inmost being, rivers of living water to the thirsty ones around us. On these terms, no offering is too insignificant, no

life too humble, no branch too small to be of immeasurable value and usefulness in God's sight.

O Master, let me walk with Thee, in conscious companionship, not in my feeble effort, but in the might of Thy Spirit, so shall I be a labourer together with Thee. Amen.

**REPORT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE SECRETARY**

Out of 86 branches in our Diocese 67 sent in reports of actual Christian Social Service.

Just what do we mean by Christian Social Service—Feeding the hungry, caring for the poor, nursing the sick, certainly. I have been asked so often what we can do beside just these. Well opportunity for service lies on every hand. The stranger within our gates needs a friendly hand. The new-made citizen expects opportunity and justice, youth needs friendship and leadership. Worthy projects that make real our claim of justice and humanity challenge us. Service to the underprivileged, the neglected ones, the sad and discontented, the poor, the needy, calls us. And as my term of office expires and I give you this last report, I would like to leave with you this definition of Christian Social Service. It is the fulfilling of Christ's second commandment, when He said "Love thy neighbor as thyself." And who is our neighbor? Science has made us into one neighborhood, surely God should make us into one brotherhood.

It is fitting that we should pause and ask ourselves what we individually are doing to make justice and opportunity the birth-right of every person? What are we doing to fit citizens to shoulder their responsibilities? What are we doing to bring courage and faith and hope into disappointed lives. Have we clothed and fed and served the needy? Have we spoken the word of cheer and extended the hand of friendship?

For three years I have talked to you about the youth in our church schools. Here is a great opportunity for our Christian Social Service, and I find many auxiliaries devoting time and service and love in this field, but there is so much to be done. Among the unemployed are according to the United States Commission of Education five million young persons between the ages of sixteen and twenty-five who can find no useful place in society. Can we afford to neglect them? Roads are not closed to youth. The needs of the world are as great as ever, therefore there is work to do, but work that requires character and vision. Our young people are the hope and promise of our church. They are our leaders of tomorrow.

As Christian Social Service leaders let us help these boys and girls catch the vision.

Tis springtime, newness of life is all about us, new hopes in every breast, new opportunities, new work, new spirit, new achievements.

There are many aids offered to us in our educational work in the Auxiliary. As mentioned, there are Church papers, meetings of various kinds. There are also summer conferences, now in reach of most of us. There are planned programs, and fine courses of study available, with a wealth of accompanying material.

We need to know about the work to be successful. The work of the Auxiliary is a joy and a privilege. Let us fit ourselves for it.

We are nearing the end of this triennium, there is much that can be done in these closing days. I commend them to you as days of opportunity. Opportunity to make the offering at the convention in October one of which we can rightfully say, "As God hath prospered us."

As we trace our blessings to that Fount from whom all blessings flow may we add this little prayer

### REPORT OF RECRUITING SECRETARY

The recruiting report for 1936 is a tribute to Mrs. Ben White, whose first questionnaire made the work so definite, as well as suggestive in going forward. A similar questionnaire was used this year, and again Forsyth-Rowan is well in the lead, both in recruiting, and in reporting their accomplishments and troubles to Mrs. R. L. Bernhardt, District secretary. Thirteen of fifteen branches sent in reports. Other districts are doing splendid work, which I learn about quite accidentally. Edgecombe District has one secretary who drove 56 miles to get her report off on time.

You will be interested in some special activities reported: St. Andrews Mission, Rockingham County, tells of training and using boys and girls in evangelistic work. Eight families are transported to Church every Sunday in Hillsboro. Christ Church, Cleveland, is justly proud of the Junior Altar Guild recently formed. The most complete and enthusiastic report of St. Paul's Winston-Salem, concludes with two requests: "Pray for us; tell us what others are doing that we may do more."

"Have you consulted with your rector concerning recruiting work?" was one question asked. On every paper answering "Yes" there was a full and enthusiastic report. Where the answer was "No" the report was mostly a question "What are we supposed to do?"

Our troubles are legion! Reports are objected to; news of other branches is asked for. Mailing lists are 50 per cent incorrect. Some branches eagerly ask for more to do; others are working so well without recruiting secretaries they dare not appoint such unneeded officers.

What is RECRUITING? Adding to God's Army; restoring to God's Army. The ways of recruiting come thru earnestness and prayer. Recruiting was done long before the Auxiliary asked us to have secretaries. St. Paul recruited, and left us reports. The Auxiliary has seen the advantage of having a secretary in every branch who will ever keep before us the work to be done; who will help the rector in doing the work; who will guide all members in adding and restoring to God's Church; who will share with others the ways she has found most helpful.

District Secretaries, KNOW your branch secretaries personally. Demand ten minutes at your district meeting to meet with them and plan your work together.

Branch Secretaries, know your district secretary, and be sure she knows your correct address. Consult with your rector for he can give you complete information about summer schools, conferences and special recruiting needs in your parish. For all other information, read the Carolina Churchman.

5. Encouraging leaders to offer their services as Church school teachers.
6. Urging attendance of Camps and Conferences.
7. Reaching the Isolated boys and girls and putting them in touch with the Diocesan Sunday School Course by correspondence.
8. Helping, when asked, to find Counsellors of Young People's Service League, and encouraging training for counsellors, and aiding this Organization in any other way possible.

I wish to express my appreciation to the Chairmen of the Districts for their cooperation. Our work will require years for development, and while we have not accomplished anything near what we would like, we are thankful for the privilege of having some little part in so great a work.

### REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF WORK AMONG ISOLATED

Your chairman is happy to report that during the past year Miss Cutler has taken over the work with isolated children. She has prepared special material for children denied the privilege

of regular church and Sunday School attendance and is sending it to parents of such children when they express a desire to have it and use it.

This year no questionnaire was sent out to glean facts regarding the number of isolated women being reached and what was being done to give these women some part in the service of the Church. Instead the president of every branch was sent a letter in which your chairman quoted Bishop Finlay's statement made in Raleigh in February that there is "an army of people outside of the Church today." These are people who are not isolated by distance, people who could come if they wanted to come. Two searching questions were asked in regard to which Bishop Penick wrote, "You have asked some plain, honest questions about our beloved Church in this diocese. To answer them will call for action and of course that is what you have been striving and praying for."

The presidents were not urged to take this matter up with their branches, and were asked not to make a report regarding what they decided to do because any thing worthwhile done to bring about regular church attendance of *all* the children, youth, and adults of our Church would be of such spiritual quality that it would be difficult to report.

Does facing any fact however appalling, which by God's help be changed, necessarily depress us? Isn't it rather the shutting our eyes to unpleasant facts that depresses us?

Of this I am certain: that the women of the Episcopal Church of this Diocese can fill the church buildings to the bursting point and then build more churches to take care of all who want to attend regularly every Sunday, if they try to do it, *and* get the help which they know so well that God will give them for the task.

Sixteen branches of the Diocesan Auxiliary are actively engaged in the work of the Church Periodical Club.

Your chairman is glad to report that during the past year one branch in the Negro District enrolled in this department and has

done efficient service. A letter of commendation was received from Miss Thomas, the Executive Secretary, in recognition of same.

Although no report was received from one district, we were gratified to note in the 1936 report of this district's Recruiting Secretary that books had been furnished a theological student.

At the beginning of the year, I wrote the president of each branch of the Auxiliary in the Diocese and asked that a C. P. C. secretary be appointed. I regret that replies have been received from only one-third of those to whom this appeal was made.

## CONSTITUTION

### ARTICLE I

#### Name

The name of this organization shall be, "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

### ARTICLE II

#### Object

The object of this organization shall be to help in carrying out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church; Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service.

### ARTICLE III

#### Membership

The membership of this organization shall be composed of all Parish and Mission Branches within the Diocese.

### ARTICLE IV

#### Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: a President, a Vice-President, who is also Secretary of the Supply Department, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of the Department of Religious Education, a Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service, and a Custodian of the United Thank Offering.

Section 2. These officers, with the District Chairmen, shall constitute the Executive Committee and shall meet at least twice a year at the call of the President.

### ARTICLE V

#### Duties of the Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for. She shall also preside at meetings, and at every Annual Meeting shall address the Auxiliary. She shall make a report to the Diocesan Convention.

Section 2. The Vice-President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have charge of the Supply Department.

Section 3. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist the President in preparing and having printed the Annual Report, and at each Annual Meeting shall make a report.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering and Box Work money, and shall make a report of same at the Annual Meeting. At the end of every fiscal year, the Treasurer's accounts shall be verified by a public auditor. The Treasurer's report, as audited, shall be published in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Section 5. The Secretary of the Department of Religious Education shall promote and stimulate educational work in the

branches of the Diocese by every means in her power, and carry out the program of the National Department of Religious Education.

Section 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service shall co-operate with the Christian Social Service Departments of the Diocese and of the National Council, in the promotion of their plans and programs.

Section 7. The Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in the Spring and Fall of each year, and shall remit immediately for investment, to the Treasurer of the National Council.

## ARTICLE VI

### Term of Office

Section 1. All Diocesan Officers shall be elected for a term of three years; the President to be elected at the Second Annual Meeting after the Triennial; the Treasurer, the Secretary of the Department of Religious Education and the Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service, the third meeting after the Triennial; and the Vice-President and the United Thank Offering Custodian, the first meeting after the Triennial. No officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms. Vacancies occurring during the year shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President for one year.

## ARTICLE VII

### Districts

Section 1. For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into Districts.

Section 2. A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman, duly elected by her District, for a term of three years. In case of vacancy, the District Supply Secretary shall serve as Chairman.

Section 3. Each District shall hold at least one, and if possible, two meetings, a year.

## ARTICLE VIII

### Election of Diocesan Officers

Section 1. Prior to the Annual Meeting, the President shall appoint from the Executive Board a nominating committee of three who shall consider proposed nominees to fill the elective offices at the Meeting, and from the names suggested or considered the Committee shall recommend to the Meeting the nominees for such offices. The consent of the nominees shall be obtained by the Committee before making the recommendation. Nominations may be made from the floor of the Meeting by any delegate provided the consent of the nominees has been first obtained. A majority vote shall be required for all elections. In case there are more than two nominees for the same office and no candidate received a majority vote, the name receiving the smallest number of votes shall be dropped from the ballot.

Section 2. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund for the Calendar Year preceding the meeting.

Section 3. All members of the Executive Committee and Committee Chairmen may vote independently of their branches.

**ARTICLE IX****Finance**

The Executive Committee in consultation with the Bishop shall prepare a budget for the year. This budget shall be presented to the branches for their support at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Section 2. From the total amount pledged towards the budget, one-half shall apply to the work of the National Council, one-half to the work of the Diocese.

Section 3. The United Thank Offering and contributions for the Supply Department shall be in addition to the payments on the budget.

**ARTICLE X****Amendments**

This Constitution may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present, provided a written copy of the proposed amendments has been filed with the Diocesan Secretary, and a notice of same mailed to each branch by the Secretary at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting.

**BY-LAWS**

The place and time of the Annual Meeting shall be approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

1. The order of Business for the Annual Meeting shall be arranged by the President and the Executive Committee.

2. Each Parish Branch having fifty members or less shall be represented by the Branch President and one other delegate (appointed by the President or elected by the Branch). The President, or her representative, and the delegates each has a vote. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the Branch to an additional delegate with power to vote.

3. Each Branch shall be assessed twenty-five cents per member to provide for Provincial Expenses, printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of Speakers, and other items necessary for the proper administration of this organization. This shall be known as the Central Fund.

4. One-fourth of the Branches having the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at the Annual Meeting. Five members shall constitute a quorum at the Executive Committee Meetings.

5. Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be the authority in all questions of Parliamentary law not covered by these By-Laws.

6. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates at any Annual Meeting.

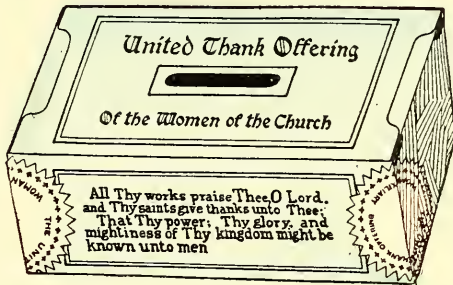

## Some Well Known United Thank Offering Facts

Every three years (since 1889) at the time of the General Convention, the women of the Church, at a Corporate Communion, place their United Thank Offerings upon the golden alms-basin and offer them to Almighty God for His work throughout the world.

The United Thank Offering is given to the Church for the support of women workers in various missionary enterprises. This includes training, equipping, sending, and care when sick or disabled, together with a designated amount for buildings in the field.

The United Thank Offering increased from \$2,000 in 1889 to \$1,101,450.40 in 1928, and amounted to \$861,693.07 in 1937.

The United Thank Offering has erected more than a dozen school buildings which enable Indian, Negro, and Mountain boys and girls of our own country and boys and girls of other lands to receive preparation for lives of Christian service.

The Church has sent out under the United Thank Offering more than four hundred women workers, who have served as doctors, nurses, teachers, social workers, evangelists, student workers, and field secretaries.

The United Thank Offering supports one man in the field—the Rt. Rev. Peter T. Rowe, Bishop of Alaska, whose salary is provided from the income of the combined offerings of 1892 and 1895.

The owner of a United Thank Offering box has, through its use, a real opportunity for spiritual growth.

The Offering is generally gathered in the dioceses twice a year for doing so helps the parish treasurers to keep track of the boxes and replace those lost or destroyed, and it keeps the United Thank Offering before the owners of the boxes. The Offering gathers more interest if deposited twice a year. The Offering need not be limited to pennies. The "widow's mite" represented all she had.

If you wish to know the joy of owning and using a blue box you may secure one from your parish treasurer of the United Thank Offering.

**ANNUAL MEETING 1938****Keynote: "Fellowship in Faith and Work."****Minutes**

The Fifty-sixth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Diocese of North Carolina convened Tuesday morning, January 18, at eleven o'clock in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Rocky Mount. The meeting was called to order by the president, Mrs. William J. Gordon. In the absence of Rev. Francis Craighill, rector of the parish, Rev. R. B. Owens, a former rector, had the opening prayers and spoke a few words of greeting.

Mrs. R. A. King, president of the hostess branch extended a cordial welcome. Response was made by Mrs. George Lyon of Durham.

At this point, Bishop Penick introduced Bishop Oldham of Albany, to whom was extended membership in the Convention by a rising vote of delegates and visitors.

The roll was called by the Secretary. The following committees were appointed:

Nominating—Mrs. H. B. Hutchinson, Mrs. Lunsford Long, Mrs. Ruth Woodward.

Elections—Mrs. Roger Gant, Mrs. Chas. Park Jr., Mrs. Ed Benbow.

Resolutions—Mrs. R. L. Riser, Mrs. Irving F. Hall, Mrs. R. L. Bernhardt.

Findings—Mrs. Urban T. Holmes Jr., Mrs. Howard Hartzell, Mrs. Susan Adams.

Courtesy—Mrs. J. S. Gaul, Mrs. H. H. Wolfe, Mrs. Pembroke Nash.

Miss Corinna Gant, Vice-President, taking the chair, the President delivered her annual address. She based her message on the keynote of the Convention, "Fellowship in Faith and Work", which was also the same used in the Triennial meeting in Cincinnati. She stressed the individual's responsibility in Christian fellowship.

The Diocesan officers made their reports, which are to be printed in the Year Book.

Noon-day prayers were led by Rev. David W. Yates.

Mrs. Gordon made recognition of three former presidents of the Auxiliary, who were present—Mrs. Frank S. Spruill, Miss Rena Clark and Miss Emma J. Hall.

Mrs. William Melvin, the former Mary Baker Jennings, who taught for six years at the Cathedral School for Girls, Havana, Cuba, was introduced.

Rev. Francis Cox, who is a missionary from this diocese in China, spoke on "Fellowship in China". He expressed appreciation for the interest of the Auxiliary and assured the women of the appreciation of the Chinese themselves for what has been done for them. He gave a brief history of missions in China and said the permanent foundations had been laid in the past two centuries. He told of the growth of an autonomous church and the degree of self support it was attaining, deploring the present tragedy. Mr. Cox gave an interesting report of Gen. Chiang Kai-shek's Christian experience and emphasized the attitude of Chinese Christians toward the Japanese.

Mrs. Francis Cox was presented to the meeting.

The meeting adjourned for luncheon at 1:00 P. M.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION—JANUARY 18

After the Convention reconvened, the Credentials Committee reported 131 accredited delegates—55 branches represented.

Rev. Frank E. Pulley, Editor of the Carolina Churchman thanked the women of the Auxiliary for the support which many have given the paper and asked that more subscribe.

Reports were received from the following Committee Chairmen: Miss Maude Cutler, Chairman Young People's Work; Mrs. F. P. Drane, Chairman Prayer Partnership Plan; Mrs. Harold Bird, Chairman Church Periodical Club; Mrs. H. C. Bourne, Chairman Work with the Isolated. Mrs. W. F. Upshaw, Chairman Committee on Legislation, submitted a platform to be presented before the Legislative Council, which was accepted by the convention. Miss Emma J. Hall, Chairman Inter-Racial Work, presented Mrs. Helena Harris, Chairman of the Negro District, who gave a report.

Mrs. S. P. Morrill was appointed as Chairman of Work among the Isolated in place of Mrs. Henry Bourne, who resigned.

The following District Chairmen were presented: Mrs. H. C. Bourne of Edgecombe, Mrs. R. W. Woodward of Forsyth-Rowan, Mrs. E. G. Flannagan of Granville, Miss Lillie Hill of Guilford, Mrs. G. K. G. Henry of Orange, Mrs. E. J. Wannamaker Jr. of Mecklenburg, Mrs. C. C. Hudnall of Richmond, Mrs. Gant of Wake and Mrs. Helena Harris of the Negro District. Their reports were handed in to be published in the Year Book.

An address was given by Mrs. L. G. McAlfee of Upi, Mindanao, Phillipine Islands on "Fellowship in the Phillipines". Mrs. McAlfee wore the costume of the Christian of the Tiruary tribe and presented Miss Kate Spruill, who was costumed as a native wild girl. Mrs. McAlfee impressed the value of the Box Work in the Mission field by her illustrations of the use of baby clothing sent her for health clinics, much work having been done by her and native co-workers in improving health conditions among children. She told in detail of the training of some of the natives, who are today valuable church workers, and gave an encouraging report of the responsiveness of the Upi people to Christian teaching. She made an appeal that we do more for the love of Christ.

Reports on Diocesan Objectives followed.

The Rev. McAlfee was presented to the Convention.

The meeting was adjourned and an informal tea was held in the parish house giving all delegates and guests an opportunity to meet special guests and speakers.

#### EVENING SERVICE—JANUARY 18th

The evening service was held at 7:30 o'clock in the Church of the Good Shepherd when the Rt. Rev. G. Ashton Oldham, D.D., Bishop of Albany, addressed the Convention and representatives of the churches of Rocky Mount on "Christian Unity". Bishop Oldham based his message on the Conference held last summer in Oxford on "Faith and Work" and in Edinburgh on "Faith and Order". He stressed the need of unity on the mission field and in every phase of life at home, urging that each group should give of its Christian experience to make a harmonious whole. He asked that we help to fulfill the prayer of our Lord that they all may be one.

#### WEDNESDAY—JANUARY 19th

At 7:30 o'clock, Wednesday morning, a Corporate Communion was held, Bishop Penick being the celebrant, assisted by Rev. Francis Craighill and Rev. George Henry. The offering formed the nucleus of the United Thank Offering for this Triennium. Following the usual custom, the names of all Auxiliary members, who have passed into the larger life in the past year, were read.

#### BUSINESS SESSION

The morning session assembled at 9:30, with the singing of hymn "As with Gladness, Men of Old". Devotions were led by the Rev. Francis Craighill, rector of the parish.

The budget of \$6800 for 1938, as recommended by the Executive Board, was presented by the acting Treasurer, Mrs. Ross Sigmon, and accepted by the Convention.

The following resolutions were recommended by the Committee on Resolutions and duly adopted:

1. Be it resolved: That only the number of second hand garments and not money value be reported through the Supply and Social Service Departments.

2. Be it resolved: That money and reports of money and clothing for children of Thompson Orphanage be sent to Supply Secretary and not to Treasurer.

3. Be it resolved: That the members of this Convention by rising express their appreciation to the following retiring officers for three years splendid service: Miss Corrinna Gant, Vice President and Supply Secretary, Mrs. H. B. Hutchison, United Thank Offering Custodian, Mrs. Ross Sigmon, Representative on the Diocesan Executive Council.

Miss Kate Spruill, Alumnae Secretary, spoke for St. Mary's School. She reported a rapid growth and many progressive steps being taken at the school. Miss Spruill spoke of plans for the celebration of the Centennial in 1942.

Rev. John L. Jackson represented Thompson Orphanage. He reported the Orphanage in splendid condition financially and asked that the women of the Auxiliary not only clothe the children but take a special interest in their well being, considering them their wards.

Miss Margaret Williams, Student Secretary at St. Mary's House, Greensboro, thanked the women of the Auxiliary for their interest in the work there. She discussed the needs of students and how these needs can be met through the Church.

Rev. Stratton Lawrence, Business Manager of Vade Mecum, outlined the schedule for the summer, and stated that many improvements are being planned.

Miss Maude Cutler, Director of the Woman's Auxiliary Conference at Vade Mecum, reported last year's conference as being very successful and spoke of plans for this year's conference.

Rev. David Yates presented the Young People's Service League, stating that the members of the Executive Council of the League are planning to make a tour through the diocese. He asked the interest of the women of the Auxiliary in this project.

Miss Mary Wood McKenzie, who is a missionary from this diocese, serving in Liberia, made an address on "Fellowship in Liberia". She expressed her gratitude to the Auxiliary for its loyal support in the past and its promised support in the future. Miss McKenzie gave many instances of how lives have been changed through Christianity, which has made the work of the mission more than worthwhile. She closed

with an appealing story, which illustrated the thankfulness of the natives themselves for the mission.

Mrs. U. T. Holmes Jr., Chairman of the Committee on Findings made the following report:

#### REPORT OF FINDINGS COMMITTEE

1. That the large and interested attendance at this Convention is indicative of a wider and deeper sense of our responsibility as members of the Woman's Auxiliary. That the proceedings of the entire meeting have been dispatched with precision and enthusiasm. That the spirit of the General Convention has been brought to this meeting by our President and the speakers.

2. That we should be very grateful to our President for giving herself as she has done and still plans to do to the work of the Auxiliary and thereby inspiring others to unflagging service.

3. That the account by Rev. Francis Cox of the work in China made us conscious of our duty to this peace-loving people, and that we, like our fellow Christians in China, should sympathize with the helpless people of Japan.

4. That the reports of the diocesan officers were a challenge to more intelligent and more effective study on our part—a call not to be satisfied with the easy and pleasant little acts of Christian kindness but to the more difficult service of study and reform.

5. That Mrs. McAlfee brought us a most vivid and realistic account of practical Christianity among the wild tribes in the Phillipines.

6. That the report given by Mrs. Helena Harris of the work of the Negro Auxiliaries was the best ever given and showed marked interest and growth, due in great part to the help and encouragement of Miss Emma Hall.

7. That Bishop Oldham's illuminating and forceful address made us aware of the need for and the possibility of one church united against the forces of destruction rampant in the world today, and requires us to direct our individual and corporate thinking to this compelling issue.

8. That we are grateful to Miss Cutler for her earnest efforts to provided guidance in our work with the young people and that we should cooperate with her more whole-heartedly, also that we take a more personal interest in our young people at the Thompson Orphanage and after they leave the Orphanage.

9. That we should feel humble before the great courage and resourcefulness of our missionaries as pictured by Miss McKenzie in her account of their work in Liberia.

10. That we will leave the Convention with a real sense of our Fellowship with Christians throughout the world.

11. That Bishop Penick in his closing address showed us that in Christ's fellowship with God, we had, as always, the Perfect Example of what our fellowship in Christ might be. Jesus' life was one of discipline, of obedience to God; of faithful fulfillment of the humble daily task. Christ was a learner and so should we be, that knowing Him we might love Him, and loving Him, we shall serve Him.

Rev. John L. Jackson, Director of the Adult Conference at Kanuga, spoke of plans for the conference to be held this summer.

The Courtesy Committee made the following report:

The Courtesy Committee in the name of each individual who has attended the Convention wishes to thank all who have made possible this helpful and inspiring Annual Meeting. We are deeply grateful to Mr. Craighill, the vestry, the Choir, and all the members of the Church of the Good Shepherd, and also the congregations of other Churches of the city for their kind hospitality.

To the Rev. Mr. Cox, Mrs. McAlfee and Miss McKenzie for their enlightening and moving messages from the field; to Bishop Oldham, who was good enough to come to us from a great distance, bringing us news of world import and individual challenge, we are especially grateful.

To our Bishop and Mrs. Gordon, we give our heartfelt thanks for the spiritual benefits received from the program. The Convention has strengthened our zeal and renewed our determination to carry on the work of our Master.

A service for the installation of the new officers was held.

The closing address of the Convention was given by Bishop Penick, his subject being "Fellowship with Christ". In speaking of the fellowship which Christ had with God his Father, he reminded us that Christ's experience was subjective. As Christ led a disciplined life so should our lives be under discipline. The Bishop closed by saying the spirit with which we do things is most important—if we love Christ, we will desire to serve Him.

Bishop Penick pronounced the benediction and the Fifty-sixth Annual Meeting was adjourned.

EXTRACTS FROM THE NORTH CAROLINA CHURCHMAN  
CONCERNING THE ANNUAL MEETING 1938

**Rousing Plea for Church Unity Made by  
Albany Bishop**

---

"Events are moving very fast and the enemies of all religion are becoming so powerful as to create a situation that demands that something be done and done quickly. It is an occasion when 'the King's business requireth haste,'" said the Right Reverend G. Ashton Oldham, Bishop of the Diocese of Albany, speaking to the delegates and visitors to the 56th Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, Tuesday evening, January 18, in Rocky Mount. "For a long time we have professed our interest in Christian unity and have set forth some excellent plans toward that end. If it be true, as I believe it is, that our Church has a very special contribution to make toward the unity of Christendom, then a heavy responsibility lies upon us to put these plans into effect."

The large congregation listened attentively as the president of the World Alliance for International Friendship through the Churches described the atmosphere in which the great world conferences on faith and order met in Edinburgh and Oxford. He said the humility and reliance upon God's guidance in all that was done was most impressive. We must pray, be humble, and make experiments in Christian unity, if we wish to attain our objective. The bishop advised his hearers not to be superior in their attitudes toward other communions, but instead to realize that we have something to give them, and something can be learned from them. "The-Church-that-is-to-be" may eventually arise from such world conference as those recently held, he concluded.

**REV. FRANCIS COX OF CHINA, MISS MARY WOOD Mc-  
KENZIE OF LIBERIA, AND MRS. S. G. McALFEE OF THE  
PHILLIPINE ISLANDS SPEAK OF THEIR LABORS  
FOR CHRIST**

---

Fellowship in Faith, keynote of the Auxiliary Annual Meeting, was made alive and vibrant by the appearance on the program of three missionary speakers who spoke on fellowship in their respective lands.

Mrs. L. G. McAlfee sketched a picture of the wild girls of the Tiruray tribe on the island of Mindanao, Phillipines, saying that some of them were even afraid of their own dead relatives. Fear of evil spirits, fear of the dead, and many other fears haunt this primitive people. Miss Kate Spruill "modeled" a typical wild girl of the Tiruray tribe, wild in the sense of being uncivilized and un-Christianized, showing the customary dress with a snake-pattern woven into it, and numerous beads and heavy anklets which all the girls wear. A sort of turban, similar to that seen on American gypsies, is worn on the head.

When first coming to civilized centers such as Zamboanga these girls would not speak to the white people, and when walking with them down the street, would follow along behind instead of by their side. Mrs. McAlfee won one's heart by giving her a ride on a merry-go-round. She told a touching and sincerely honest story of how these backward folk are responding to Christ and becoming teachers, nurses and house-wives in their native villages.

Baby clinics were started in her fields, she continued, when American auxiliaries sent boxes of baby clothing to her for distribution. One man appeared with a baby having an angry, red sore on its head resembling raw beefsteak and as large as half a hand. It seemed that the man was so anxious to win a prize of baby clothing, he had literally scrubbed the child's skin off its head. The missionary said men, women and children traveled miles to see her, as she was the first white woman they had ever seen. The crowds entered heartily into her campaign to improve infant hygiene via the "baby clinics and contests." Mrs. McAlfee wore, in contrast to the native girl's costume, the clothes of a Christianized woman. Mr. McAlfee, who labors with her in their difficult but fruitful field, did not speak due to limitation of time.

Miss Mary Wood McKenzie, of Liberia, and native of North Carolina, gave a convincing and inspiring account of her efforts in Africa. She told of a man who is senior warden of her mission, and a senator. He refused the offer to be Governor of his county, she said, because he felt that he could do more good for his people in the legislature. This same man often stood in the legislature against every other member of his party, if necessary, Miss McKenzie said. Such instances and others she described have convinced her that results of 100 years' work in Liberia are worthwhile.

Another native North Carolinian, the Rev. Francis Cox, of Soochow, China, gave an interesting and moving picture of his work in that war-torn country. He said the Chinese are peace-loving by nature, and that the Church was just attaining autonomy in China when war came. Mr. Cox gave a condensed history of China as a necessary background to understanding its people and government. He pleaded for continued fellowship with the Christian element both in China and Japan, joining with the other speakers, in thanking the women of the Church for their constant support which tremendously encourages the missionaries and people with whom they work.

## BISHOP PENICK DELIVERS CLOSING CHARGE TO AUXILIARY ANNUAL MEETING

---

What was Christ's fellowship in God? Choosing as his subject, our fellowship in Christ, Bishop Penick closed the 56th annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, Wednesday noon. The bishop declared that his subject was one upon which our words should be few. Christ lived and died without leaving a single written word for our guidance. We know Him only through reminiscences, remembrances of others. Therefore all His teachings are objective, His experience with God, however, was subjective.

The bishop developed the account of our Lord going up to Jerusalem as a boy, saying that Jesus had a rule of life, in that Joseph and Mary and Jesus went up to be taxed "every year". We need a "rule of life," discipline, the diocesan said. Obedience to God is the only thing that liberates us. We can disobey God, He does not make us obey. Freedom comes for us, as it did for Christ, through obedience.

"Then Jesus was a learner. He sat in the temple, hearing them and asking them questions. Our discipleship is youthful, immature. We need to listen and ask questions if we would know fellowship in Christ.

"Again, the Master exercised His freedom by deliberately choosing to be identified with obscurity for eighteen years. We know little of the hidden Jesus, but we may assume that His activities during this period were in preparation for His public ministry later. Jesus prepared for His public life by sweeping the shavings out of a carpenter shop. Does this not suggest to us that through simple, homely, routine chores we may be prepared for His kingdom?"

The bishop closed by saying the spirit with which we do things is the important factor. Jesus is known as much as He is loved. If you love Him, you will serve Him.

## THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS TO THE CONVENTION OF 1938

Bishop Penick, Women of the Auxiliary and Guests,  
Greeting:

We are met under conditions to which we must give our best thought and devotion. First of all, this Annual Session is in the nature of an experiment, as it is our first meeting in mid-winter rather than in an anticipated springtime setting. The change has been made in the best interests of our work; it is our place to endeavor to appraise the results. The annual meeting is for the consideration of the past year's activities, the major portion of which ended on December 31, to make a new beginning with the new calendar year. From this point of view, January seems a reasonable time to meet.

We are meeting too, in the atmosphere that comes to us triennially in the wake of general convention. The keynote of our meeting, "Fellowship in Faith and Work," which we have tried to develop throughout the program, is the same as that used in the triennial meeting in Cincinnati. Very simply interpreted, this brief phrase means that God has made us all, and loves us all, and expects us to live and serve together as members of His family. Its implications are tremendous as they challenge us to search our attitudes, our prejudices, and the practical expression of our Christian faith. The two outstanding messages of General Convention concerned "Christian Unity" and a forward missionary program. I shall not anticipate the message we shall hear this evening from Bishop Oldham, but I do urge us to approach our fellow Christians with a more sincere spirit of appreciation, and to dwell more upon the great fundamentals that we have in common and less upon our differences, and to engage in such practical concerted Christian activities as the opportunity offers. One such occasion is the World Day of Prayer, observed annually on the first Friday in Lent. Is it too much to hope that each branch of this diocesan Auxiliary shall share in the observance of this day together with the other missionary societies of that day?

General Convention has ordered that the church shall go forward in her missionary march, but the re-

sponse must come from the individuals in the ranks. Your Auxiliary delegates to Cincinnati were very happily seated immediately behind the delegation from Michigan, and from them we bring you this direct and searching message of the individual's responsibility:

**I love Jesus Christ and want to be His disciple. Therefore I must set forward His Kingdom on earth.**

**To do this I must prepare myself by study, worship and prayer. Having prepared myself, I must work individually and in my group in the Five Fields of service—the parish, the community, the diocese, the nation and the world.**

**I cannot do all of the work of the world, so I must give as generously as possible that others may do it.**

**Finally, I believe that it matters tremendously whether or not I, one woman, do this, and it will affect the progress of the Kingdom.**

I have read the branch reports with interest. On the whole they show reason for encouragement and thanksgiving, both in organization and in activity. Particularly do we rejoice in a gift of life from St. Peter's, Charlotte, in the appointment of Miss Norene Quern to teach in the Cathedral School for Girls, Havana.

I submit to you a brief report of your President's activities since the last Annual Meeting. I have shared in eight branch meetings and twelve district meetings, attended two meetings of the Auxiliary Executive Board, and one of the Finance Committee, three meetings of the Diocesan Executive Board, and one meeting of the Vade Mecum Camp committee. I taught the Auxiliary course at the St. Augustine's Conference and made the twilight talks at the Auxiliary conference at Vade Mecum. Outside the diocese, I have attended three meetings of the Provincial Board, addressed the Auxiliary of Epiphany Church, Danville, and the Conference of the Diocese of Southern Virginia at Chatham, made two addresses to the Auxiliary of Trinity Church, Asheville, taught two courses at the Kanuga Adult conference and presided at Auxiliary Day, attended the triennial meeting and led one of the sectional groups.

Our past year seems, each to the other, a busy one, but we meet today amid such solemn world conditions that we must ask ourselves, "How vital has it all been?" Has it made any difference to our re-

spective communities that we have a branch of the Auxiliary there? Have men and women, amid all the temporal uncertainties, found God through His use of us? In addition to our gifts and our deeds of Christian kindness, have we shared our Christ? Or have we through all the maze of our organization and activity, failed to see the real purpose of discipleship and of the Auxiliary. The primary purpose of the Auxiliary is not things, but the uplifting of Christ that He may draw men unto Himself. It is not selfish to say that our chief concern as Auxiliary women is not with China or Japan or the other distressed nations of the earth, but with the kind of disciple I am right where I live, and when that is acceptable, I can be used, under God, to have a proper weight on world conditions. "The Father seeketh such to serve Him". But no half-hearted discipleship or divided allegiance will avail. We must live all that these blessed words imply, Here I offer and present myself, make me what thou wouldst have me to be, and then, dear Lord, use even me.

**REPORT OF SUPPLY SECRETARY FOR 1937**

The work in the Supply Department has continued to grow. Each successive year the Diocese of North Carolina has been allotted an increased quota. In 1937 we have been able to fill our allotment by the fine cooperation of the District and Branch Chairmen, who have extended themselves in faithful work and close buying.

The interest throughout the Diocese in the Supply work has deepened, as is evidenced by personal letters, inquiries and increased pledges from the Branches. In several Districts one hundred per cent of the Branches have reported.

Realizing that the District Chairmen are both capable and willing to do the work, I have entrusted them with the buying, cutting and making of the garments used in our Mission boxes. The result is that we have never had more attractive or better made garments. All of the Districts have done excellent work in this department.

Letters from our missionaries in regard to personal and mission boxes sent them show great appreciation and are stimulating to us.

I am glad to report that all of our work for 1937 has been completed and a special offering of \$54.90 has been sent to the National headquarters for our missionaries from China who are refugeeing in Japan.

### CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE

Diocesan reports indicate a lively interest in Christian Social Service. While the work has been widely varied in scope, there seems to be a desire on the part of many to pioneer and "blaze new trails" in an effort to cure our social ills rather than accept them as something we will always have with us.

This is a healthy sign and once a militant, Christ-like society becomes aroused to the economic bondage and social degradation of our fellowmen, we will become a mighty force in moulding public opinion to the end that a better social order is achieved.

Whether in city, town or tiny hamlet, every woman has the privilege of the ballot, and she should use it intelligently. It is our Christian duty to enlighten ourselves on legislation which affects public welfare. Let us become informed women and then we will no longer be indifferent women, but will strive to do our bit for the good of humanity.

A challenge to the Church is contained in the statement of Roger Babson, considered by many to be our most reliable economic analyst, who said: "We will have better government and better business only when we have better people. And our only hope is that the churches and educational institutions will produce them." Let us accept our part of that responsibility!

The work done by many branches is worthy of special mention, but from Emanuel Church at Southern Pines comes a note of progress and pioneering. This branch concentrates upon the betterment of health conditions. It maintains a Committee on Pre-natal Work which coordinates its efforts with that of the county nurse in charge of this particular field. The Executive Committee of the Committee on Negro Welfare, which maintains a venereal clinic for the control of extreme social diseases, is made up in its white membership of the members of Emanuel Church.

The smaller branches haven't had an opportunity for service in the broader field, but they do an amazing amount of work, so much of which there is no record save in the Book of Life, but which is indelibly inscribed by Him who sees all things.

### REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY 1937

---

Sixty six of you have reported to me, and as I see it I must report back to you not only on our achievements but on our needs for the coming year.

With so many branches not reporting, figures would mean little, therefore I have omitted them. I have tried hard to see through your reports and get to know you, to find out what the Auxiliary needs in Religious Education.

Quickened interest in the women is the need which is voiced by most.

The majority of the branches feel that the answer for this is new program material but it seems to me that that is not the

answer. I searched the reports a second time to see what others thought, and in four of them I found suggestions which seemed to me steps toward this end.

First in a request for suitable Bible study material. The second suggestion is for more Quiet Days or Retreats. The third suggestion is for better attendance at Church, Church School and Study Classes. And fourth, I quote, "Gradual education of the women that rummage sales are not the works of 'faith and works'. Teach the women to be neighborly; teach them holiness. There is no limit to the work we could do if we include this general attitude in our Educational Program."

I feel sure that the request for Retreats throughout the Diocese is the outgrowth of the four Quiet Days held by Mrs. Gordon last year for they made a deep impression upon the women who attended.

Our Diocesan Conference at Vade Mecum met many needs in our spiritual life. First, that for true fellowship in its deepest sense of mutual understanding, which was had through work and play together, and through having time and place for talk one with another about matters of the Spirit.

The second need which was met was a better understanding of the plans and aims of the Auxiliary through study of methods. The most important need of all, a drawing nearer to God, was met through Bishop Penick's class on the parables of the New Testament and through worship together in the freshness of the early morning and in the evening shadows of the everlasting hills. At every one of these evening services Mrs. Gordon flung the women a glorious challenge to victorious living which stirred them to the depths.

The three institutes on Rebuilding Rural America held by the Rev. C. E. B. Robinson were full of ideas which could be most constructive.

The Diocesan Christmas cards in some instances filled a deep spiritual need.

As we look forward to our theme for this triennial let us see what the committee on Findings of the Triennial Meeting has to say. They asked themselves, "How shall we work out a program for the women of the Church which will deepen and extend fellowship in faith and work?"

Six topics were included in their report. Evangelism, Christian Unity and Cooperation, War and Peace, Social and Economic Life, Service and Personnel, and Church and State.

Two characteristic statements from the Findings were, "We must keep in mind that Christianity never fails nor can fail but that we fail in our witness". And again, "The first step in evangelism must always be a renewing of our own faith."

What is Religious Education? "It is preparation of the Spirit for its Life."

I give you the slogan which Bishop Stewart gave the General Convention—"Not More Money but More Grace."

We reached the depths in 1934. We have climbed steadily and surely each year since, both in interest and in generosity. May this increased interest and generosity be a permanent resolve in this diocese.

I thank you for having given me a part in this great work and it is with an humble and grateful heart that I bid you: Go Forward with the United Thank Offering.

The Supply Department has also been in capable hands, and its aims and purpose made clear through the diligent and untiring efforts of Mrs. George Mitchell. Her appearance before the branches on behalf of the Box Work has borne fruit.

We were privileged to hear Bishop Shirley Nichols of Japan give us first hand reports of our work in the Orient. Miss Mary Wood McKenzie of Cape Mount, Liberia, and the Rev. Hector Thompson of Wyoming, also spoke in the interest of their work.

The spring meeting was held at St. Paul's Church, Monroe. Stereotyped reports were dispensed with and short inspirational talks made on departmental Auxiliary work. Mrs. R. L. Bernhardt, District Recruiting Secretary of Forsyth Rowan, was the guest speaker. She emphasized the methods used in her district which has made it outstanding in the recruiting field.

The fall meeting was held at St. Martin's Church, Charlotte, with a record attendance. Four new officers were elected: Chairman, Mrs. E. J. Wanamaker, Jr.; Vice-President and Supply Secretary, Mrs. Everett Croxton; United Bank Offering Treasurer: Mrs. Thos. B. Longhurst; Educational Secretary, Mrs. F. B. Rupert. The high-light of the meeting was the announcement that Miss Noreen Quern of St. Peter's Church, Charlotte, had offered herself for the mission field. She was accepted and assigned to the Cathedral School at Havana, Cuba, reporting for duty early in September. The Rev. John Long Jackson, speaking for the Executive Board of the Thompson Orphanage, asked that a District Committee be appointed to do special work at the Orphanage. Mrs. R. W. Ballard was asked to organize and convene the committee. A distinct challenge to the diocese was Mr. Jackson's appeal for missionary minded Church women to fill such vacancies as occur in the Thompson Orphanage staff of matrons. Mrs. Ross Sigmon was the principal speaker, and brought us first hand news of the General Convention. She paid deserved tribute to Miss Enma Hall, whose name was presented at the convention for membership on the National Council; and to Mrs. William Gordon, our President, who had a conspicuous part in the services.

The retiring Chairman feels that the District Auxiliary, if properly used, can render valuable service in coordinating diocesan and parish work. The chairman opened the meeting by remarks based on the hymn "In the Vineyard of Our Father". The idea brought out was that each branch, each diocese and all the world is the

vineyard and we as members of the Auxiliary are the gleaners with daily work to do.

The reports from the branches were encouraging as they showed more work being covered by the different secretaries of the Auxiliaries.

The program for the year was outlined by Mrs. William L. Long, Diocesan Educational Secretary.

The United Thank offering Custodian reported \$53.04.

Bishop Penick and Mrs. William J. Gordon reviewed the General Convention. They were very enthusiastic in their remarks.

Ten branches were represented at this meeting. Our appeal goes out to those not present that they may make every effort possible to be with us at the Spring meeting at Saint Titus Church, Durham, N. C. in May.

## COMMITTEE REPORTS

### REPORT OF RECRUITING SECRETARY

Letters, in place of the usual questionnaires, have been a real joy to the Secretary. Statistics in recruiting omit the best work, while letters about the work are most encouraging. But WHY does Forsyth-Rowan continue to be the only district to report 100%? The enthusiasm of Mrs. Bernhardt is reflected in every branch letter.

At last we all know recruiting is adding and restoring to Holy Church. We used to think it meant only to get a recruit for the ministry, preferably for foreign missions. That was a fairly discouraging job for 95% of our branches. Now we know the full meaning of recruiting for God, and that there is work for the largest and smallest branches.

For 1938 let us consider two special works of recruiting.

Every year Youth, when High School graduation is just ahead, asks: "What will be my vocation" (only Youth says, NOW WHAT?). Then we, parents, and interested friends gravely consider, engineering? law? teaching? Right here is a place to remind Youth that Mother Church has wonderful opportunities for Youth; should not these be as carefully considered as engineering? Surely no young man or woman will begin to study for a life work without carefully considering the work most appealing to him and her. Let all the Church works be included in the careful considering: the priesthood, the Church Army, education, Christian social service medical missionary, monastic life,—so many opportunities that should be studied and consideration along with law and agriculture. Here is a recruiting work needed in every branch in our Diocese.

The study classes this year will point the way for definite and personal recruiting work right at home, and next door. The City Churches, will learn of their dependence upon the Country

Churches, and will gladly recruit from their membership to supply leadership for the surrounding rural churches, Sunday schools and auxiliaries. The Rural Churches will continue to teach and make good Churchmen who all too soon must go to the city to work, and they become loyal workers in the City Church. There is no limit to the recruiting we can learn about thru the study of Rural Churches. Let us grasp those opportunities and push forward. With one person in every branch responsible for the carrying out of this work, with the assistance of your Rector and other Auxiliary members, we need not question results. With God as your guide and strength, you will want to write to your district secretary next November, and express your gratitude for the privilege of being recruiting secretary in your branch.

### REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF THE COMMITTEE ON YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK

I The Chairman of the Committee on Young People's Work feels encouraged this year for the following reasons:

1. All District Secretaries are truly active and anxious to further the work of our young people in every way possible.
2. We are beginning to understand now that young people's work is concerned with all of our youth from the youngest baby to adulthood, and not with Young People's Service League alone.
3. More of our Auxiliary women are teaching in the Church Schools, and serving as counsellors for the Service League
4. The work among our isolated children and young people is going forward. There are twenty-two members of the Sunday school class by mail who have sent in their work regularly this year.
5. There seems to be an awakening of interest in really learning to meet the needs of our youth, helping them to live joyful Christian lives as they develop toward adulthood, and to take their places in Christ's body the Church.

II Some of our greatest needs as revealed through a recent questionnaire sent out by the District Secretaries:

1. More active Little Helper's Workers in the Parishes and Missions. If your Church does not have this most **important** work write to Mrs. T. P. Thomas, Wilson, N. C., and ask for help in getting it started.
2. A committee on Christian education in every Parish and Mission to plan for the Christian nurture of every member of the Parish. No Minister can do the whole job alone.
3. More teacher training through—
  - (a) attending Summer Conferences.
  - (b) taking correspondence courses.
  - (c) having classes for parents and teachers in the parish.
4. More Junior Choirs where children learn to worship through really participating in the service.

5. More Vacation Bible Schools and Children's Missions.
6. More adequate missionary education.
7. More and better parish libraries.
8. More thought given to how the children and young people can have a real part in the work of the parish, also more effort made to really guide our youth in worship, in thinking, in gaining the most helpful information, and in service.

### REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF COMMITTEE ON WORK WITH THE ISOLATED

Letters have been sent to every branch in the Diocese giving a suggested plan of Work with the Isolated. If you would send in to the Chairman of this Committee an account of your efforts and accomplishments in this field, it would serve as an inspiration and a challenge to other branches. I have the names of a few isolated people in the Diocese who are eager for contact with the life of the church—they would be grateful for letters, church papers, forward movement pamphlets and books. Most of these people are isolated by invalidism. There are others who ask only for an opportunity to share in the work of the auxiliary, one member who speaks of herself as isolated writes cheering letters to other shut-ins.

As you watch the crowd of people on the streets of your town Saturday afternoons, do you not wonder how many are touched by the life of the church—how many know fellowship in the love of Christ with others who worship and serve Him. If we think with an understanding heart we know that people are not always isolated by distance or by invalidism. In our study book we read: "Recent studies of religious conditions in our rural communities reveal some alarming facts. More than ten thousand of these communities are without a Sunday school; thirty thousand rural hamlets are without spiritual guidance or teaching by persons trained to impart religious instruction. Thus about thirteen millions of children and young people of school age receive no Christian instruction. These facts should

stir the church to an enlarged sense of responsibility for the spiritual care of the nation's children."

The Woman's Auxiliary could do no greater service than for its members to go out into isolated communities where there is no church and start Sunday schools for children and other people. Most glorious results have come from such efforts in our Diocese in the past. Sunday Schools that started in rural or factory communities with two or three faithful teachers, have developed into flourishing missions that have sent priests and missionaries out to spread the gospel. Surely work that bears such fruit and is so clearly the Master's business demands our most faithful and zealous labor.

**REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB**  
**FOR THE YEAR 1937**

At the annual meeting of the Auxiliary last year in Raleigh I recall hearing Mrs. Grafton Burke of Alaska tell of one man who took some provisions from his sled to make room for reading matter sent by the Church Periodical Club. He must have felt as the Psalmist when he said, "Thy word is a lantern unto my feet and a light unto my path". That incident is the embodiment of the work done by this organization—supplying reading material to those who need it.

The report of the seventeen parish branches active in this work are very gratifying to me. One branch reports having taken out a magazine subscription for their prayer partner—an excellent idea. Many others are regularly sending magazines to many parts of the country. Reading matter has been sent to Rosebud mission in Bishop Robert's diocese of South Dakota and to St. Mark's mission in Nenana, Alaska. In our own diocese over thirty institutions have benefited by our interest, among them being;—orphanages, rural schools, jails, prison camps, hospitals and C.C.C. camps.

It is my earnest wish that more branches of this work may be established throughout the diocese. Many do not understand just what the Church Periodical Club is. I feel this is due to my lack of effort and not to your lack of interest. Please let me help you know it better.

## CONSTITUTION

### ARTICLE I

#### Name

The name of this organization shall be, "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

### ARTICLE II

#### Object

The object of this organization shall be to help in carrying out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church; Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service.

### ARTICLE III

#### Membership

The membership of this organization shall be composed of all Parish and Mission Branches within the Diocese.

### ARTICLE IV

#### Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: a President, a Vice-President, who is also Secretary of the Supply Department, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of the Department of Religious Education, a Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service, and a Custodian of the United Thank Offering.

Section 2. These officers, with the District Chairmen, shall constitute the Executive Committee and shall meet at least twice a year at the call of the President.

### ARTICLE V

#### Duties of the Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for. She shall also preside at meetings, and at every Annual Meeting shall address the Auxiliary. She shall make a report to the Diocesan Convention.

Section 2. The Vice-President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have charge of the Supply Department.

Section 3. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist the President in preparing and having printed the Annual Report, and at each Annual Meeting shall make a report.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering and Box Work money, and shall make a report of same at the Annual Meeting. At the end of every fiscal year, the Treasurer's accounts shall be verified by a public auditor. The Treasurer's report, as audited, shall be published in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Section 5. The Secretary of the Department of Religious Education shall promote and stimulate educational work in the branches of the Diocese by every means in her power, and carry out the program of the National Department of Religious Education.

Section 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service shall co-operate with the Christian Social Service Departments of the Diocese and of the National Council, in the promotion of their plans and programs.

Section 7. The Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in the Spring and Fall of

each year, and shall remit immediately for investment, to the Treasurer of the National Council.

#### **ARTICLE VI** **Term of Office**

Section 1. All Diocesan Officers shall be elected for a term of three years; the President to be elected at the Second Annual Meeting after the Triennial; the Treasurer, the Secretary of the Department of Religious Education and the Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service, the third meeting after the Triennial; and the Vice-President and the United Thank Offering Custodian, the first meeting after the Triennial. No officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms. Vacancies occurring during the year shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President for one year.

#### **ARTICLE VII** **Districts**

Section 1. For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into Districts.

Section 2. A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman, duly elected by her District, for a term of three years. In case of vacancy, the District Supply Secretary shall serve as Chairman.

Section 3. Each District shall hold at least one, and if possible, two meetings, a year.

#### **ARTICLE VIII** **Election of Diocesan Officers**

Section 1. Prior to the Annual Meeting, the President shall appoint from the Executive Board a nominating committee of three who shall consider proposed nominees to fill the elective offices at the Meeting, and from the names suggested or considered the Committee shall recommend to the Meeting the nominees for such offices. The consent of the nominees shall be obtained by the Committee before making the recommendation. Nominations may be made from the floor of the Meeting by any delegate provided the consent of the nominees has been first obtained. A majority vote shall be required for all elections. In case there are more than two nominees for the same office and no candidate received a majority vote, the name receiving the smallest number of votes shall be dropped from the ballot.

Section 2. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund for the Calendar Year preceding the meeting.

Section 3. All members of the Executive Committee and Committee Chairmen may vote independently of their branches.

#### **ARTICLE IX** **Finance**

The Executive Committee in consultation with the Bishop shall prepare a budget for the year. This budget shall be presented to the branches for their support at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Section 2. From the total amount pledged towards the budget, one-half shall apply to the work of the National Council, one-half to the work of the Diocese.

Section 3. The United Thank Offering and contributions for the Supply Department shall be in addition to the payments on the budget.

## **ARTICLE X**

### **Amendments**

This Constitution may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present, provided a written copy of the proposed amendments has been filed with the Diocesan Secretary, and a notice of same mailed to each branch by the Secretary at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting.

### **BY-LAWS**

The place and time of the Annual Meeting shall be approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

1. The order of Business for the Annual Meeting shall be arranged by the President and the Executive Committee.

2. Each Parish Branch having fifty members or less shall be represented by the Branch President and one other delegate (appointed by the President or elected by the Branch). The President, or her representative, and the delegates each has a vote. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the Branch to an additional delegate with power to vote.

3. Each Branch shall be assessed twenty-five cents per member to provide for Provincial Expenses, printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of Speakers, and other items necessary for the proper administration of this organization. This shall be known as the Central Fund.

4. One-fourth of the Branches having the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at the Annual Meeting. Five members shall constitute a quorum at the Executive Committee Meetings.

5. Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be the authority in all questions of Parliamentary law not covered by these By-Laws.

6. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates at any Annual Meeting.

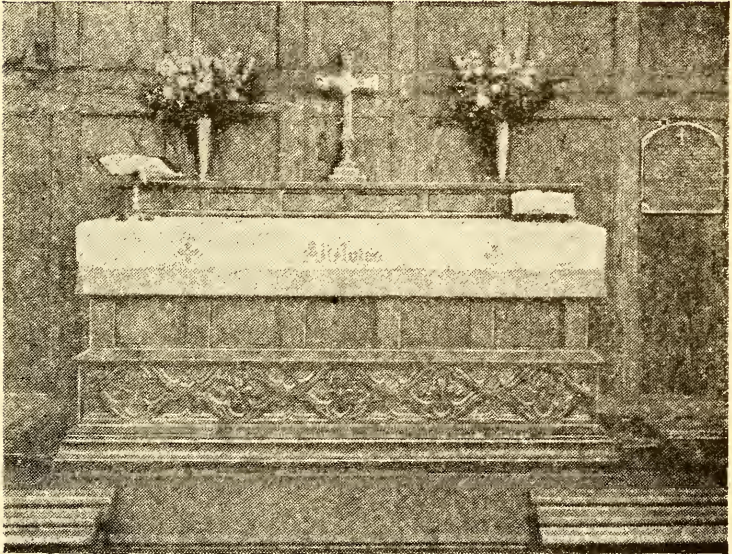

Mrs. J. A. Mackie, Treasurer, presented the budget of \$6800 for 1940, as recommended by the Executive Board. A motion was made and carried that this budget be adopted.

Canon F. E. Howitt, of Hamilton, Ontario, led a meditation on "The Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ", He gave several definitions of Grace and spoke of its practical application in the life of a person, resulting in salvation and empowering for daily living and service. He told us that the Woman's Auxiliary in Canada is an outgrowth of the Woman's Auxiliary in this country and reminded us all that the richest, fullest results in the work of the Auxiliary will only be found in dependence upon the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Mrs. Gordon brought a message of appreciation to the Auxiliary from William Gordon, Diocesan President of the Y.P.S.L. Bill was unable to attend the Convention, due to an accident.

The meeting adjourned for luncheon at 1:00 P.M.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION—JANUARY 12

At the opening of the afternoon session, the Credentials Committee reported 128 accredited delegates—49 parishes represented.

The report of the Nominating Committee followed. The election resulted in Mrs. W. S. Holmes being elected as President and the following delegates and alternates being elected for the Provincial Meeting:

Delegates—Mrs. W. S. Holmes, Mrs. W. J. Gordon, Mrs. Francis Clarkson, Mrs. Pembroke Nash, Mrs. J. A. Mackie.

Alternates—Mrs. Edwin Penick, Miss Emma Hall, Mrs. Urban Holmes, Mrs. George Lyon, Mrs. Alex Cooper.

Miss Margaret Monteiro, who has been a missionary in China for eighteen years, addressed the Convention on "The Challenge of China". She reviewed the history of Missions in China and the recent progress in the development of the country up until the war. She spoke with deep appreciation of the courage and sacrifice of the missionaries who were determined to stay at any cost, and challenged the women of the Auxiliary to share in the building of the Kingdom of God not only in China but all over the world.

At the close of her address, Rev. Craighill Brown, formerly a missionary in China, led in a special prayer for the needs in China.

The meeting was adjourned and an informal tea was held in the Parish House.

### EVENING SERVICE

The evening service was held in the Chapel of the Cross when the Rt. Rev. Henry St. George Tucker, Presiding Bishop, addressed the Convention. Using Act. 1:8 as a text, the Bishop first reminded us that the Kingdom is not merely for Israel or any other nation but Christ's emphasis was on the uttermost parts of the earth and whether we wish it or not, we are all foreign missionaries, in that our influence is felt all over the world. His second point was that the power of God in the individual life is the means by which the Kingdom shall be built. He closed by stating that if we are going to present Jesus Christ as the Saviour of the world, we must do it by demonstrating in our own lives that Christ is enabling us to meet our own problems. His address was broadcast over WDNC and picked up by WPTF in Raleigh.

### FRIDAY—JANUARY 13

At 7:30 o'clock, a Corporate Communion was held with Rev. A. S. Lawrence being the Celebrant, assisted by Rev. Geo. Henry, Rev. David Yates and Rev. A. S. Lawrence, Jr. There was a presentation of the United Thank Offering and the names of all Auxiliary members who have passed into the larger life since the last Annual Meeting were read.

### BUSINESS SESSION

The morning session opened at 9:30. Devotions were led by Rev. A. S. Lawrence Jr.

The District Chairmen were presented. Their reports were handed in and are to be printed in the Year Book.

Miss Emma Hall, Chairman of the Committee on Inter-Racial Work, gave the report of Mrs. Helena Harris, Chairman of the Negro District.

Reports were received from the following Committee Chairmen: Miss Emma Hall, Chairman Inter-Racial Work; Mrs. E. G. Peoples, Chairman Young People's Work; Mrs. F. B. Drane, Chairman Prayer Partnership Plan; Mrs. C. E. B. Robinson, Chairman

Recruiting; Mrs. Harold Bird, Chairman Church Periodical Club; Mrs. S. P. Morrill, Chairman Work with Isolated; Mrs. W. F. Upshaw, Chairman Legislative Committee.

Miss Maude Cutler, Director of Religious Education, gave a report of her work. She impressed upon the women of the Auxiliary the importance of giving our children a part in the building of God's Kingdom.

Mrs. U. T. Holmes, United Thank Offering Custodian, reported the offering as being \$6704.50, since the last meeting.

The following resolutions were recommended by the Committee on Resolutions and duly adopted:

1. Whereas, the diocesan president upon taking office finds it necessary to take several months to familiarize herself with the details of office,

Be it resolved: That the diocesan president shall be elected at the Annual Meeting held the year before she shall take office; and be it further resolved, That she shall be without authority during that year but with the privilege of attending all the Executive Board Meetings. (This resolution was only approved by the Convention and referred to the Committee on Organization).

2. Be it resolved: That more emphasis be laid upon the spiritual phase, particularly the devotionals of branch meetings.

3. Be it resolved: That the roll call of the Annual Meeting be postponed until later in the first session, to insure a full response.

4. Be it resolved: That diocesan officers acquaint their district officers with the duties of their offices; that they in turn send their proper blanks to the branch secretaries, making possible their qualification for the Honor Roll.

Be it also resolved: That the branch secretaries be more diligent in returning their reports to the same end.

5. Be it resolved: That delegates arrive on time and register promptly, saving social greetings until adjournment of the meeting.

6. Be it resolved: That we thank Mrs. Easley, our retiring Secretary for her three years of devoted and expert service, and be it further resolved: That Mrs. Gordon, our retiring President, be thanked by the Auxiliary of the Diocese to the best of our ability for her inspired leadership in the past three years, for her tireless activity and wonderful accomplishments as our head, and above all, for her blessed influence upon every woman who has heard and known her and the radiant example she set us of a Christ-like life.

The following resolution was passed by the Executive Board and also presented to the Convention:

Whereas the members of the Jewish faith are undergoing at present persecutions of an extreme nature,

And whereas, our Christian regard for our fellowman is shocked at this unbelievable cruelty, Be it resolved that our sympathy be expressed for our Jewish brethren,

And be it further resolved that we send a tangible expression of our sympathy to the Jewish Relief Fund.

Syd Alexander brought a word of greeting from the Young People's Service League. He thanked the women of the Auxiliary for the aid given the League, especially in the restoration of the Chapel at Vade Mecum.

The Rt. Rev. Henry St. George Tucker, Presiding Bishop, addressed the Convention informally on Missions. He outlined the problems which confront the Church as to Domestic and Foreign Missions stating that to make our Foreign Missionary work more effective, we must make our Diocesan work more effective. Bishop Tucker closed with an appeal for a Christian service which involves two kinds of sacrifice—a sacrifice with a quality which shall make the sacrifice more efficacious and a sacrifice which is unlimited.

Reports on Diocesan Objectives followed.

Miss Kate Spruill, Alumnae Secretary, presented St. Mary's School. She gave an encouraging report of the progressive steps being taken at the school.

Rev. David Yates spoke for Vade Mecum, outlining the program for the summer and suggesting that plans be made early for attendance at the Conferences and Camps.

Mrs. Gordon announced that Miss Maude Cutler would be in charge of the Woman's Auxiliary Conference at Vade Mecum.

Mrs. Gordon reported that a gift from the Auxiliary is to be made toward furnishing the Chapel, which is to be built at Kanuga in memory of Bishop Findlay. This gift is in recognition of the contribution Rev. John L. Jackson has made to Kanuga.

Rev. John L. Jackson gave plans for the Kanuga Adult Conference and urged the importance of attending.

Miss Lida Holt, Supervising Matron of Thompson

Orphanage, brought a message from the Orphanage. She gave us a picture of life at the Orphanage and thanked the women of the Auxiliary for their interest in the children there.

Miss Margaret Williams, Student Secretary at St. Mary's House, Greensboro, presented two students from Woman's College, who are associated with St. Mary's House. Miss Edith Turner had as her subject, "What the Student does in the Work of the Church" and Miss Mary Catherine McLaughlin used as her subject, "What the Church Does for the Student."

Miss Bessie Blacknall, who is a missionary from this Diocese, stationed at St. Mark's Mission, Nenana, Alaska, brought a message to the Convention. She described the physical conditions in Alaska and gave a vivid picture of life at the mission, making reference to the value of the root cellar which was given by the Auxiliary.

Mrs. Francis Clarkson, Chairman of Committee of Findings presented the following report:

#### REPORT OF FINDINGS COMMITTEE

1. That in the spirit of this Convention has been manifested an earnest desire to recognize our responsibility as individual Christians and as a group of women carrying the message of Christ to those who do not know Him.

2. That our President's message reported to us the wistfulness for deeper spiritual understanding on the part of the branches and urged us to a conception of Auxiliary work higher than mere organization, to a zeal that would be satisfied with nothing less than seeking God, and when we should find Him, presenting Him with ourselves and our dearest possessions.

3. That the reports of the diocesan officers and committee chairmen presented a challenge not merely to greater and broader fields of service but to a soul searching of ourselves, of the spirit of our work, and of our own lives as examples of Christian living.

4. That from Canon Howitt's meditation we gained a clearer conception of the Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that to receive it, we must accept it, and that through His grace alone can our work be accomplished.

5. That the strength of Miss Monteiro's Christian conviction and the courage and perseverance of the missionaries in China in the face of untold dangers made us feel a great shame for our luke warm Christianity and our attitude of seeming indifference.

6. That Bishop Tucker clearly and forcibly brought to us the message of Christ to the early disciples—that we are His witnesses throughout the world and that His power works through us to draw all men to Him.

7. That the encouraging report of the Negro district deserves a real and active interest on the part of us all.

8. That Bishop Tucker presented to us a vivid picture of the work of the Church and particularly in Japan, showing the glorious share that we may have through real sacrifice in this work.

9. That we should feel encouraged over the progress our diocesan objectives are making toward their goals.

10. That the graciousness of Miss Bessie Blacknall made us glow with pride for our share in the work in Alaska and with pride in our missionary representatives and the work they are doing in that far northern country.

A message of greeting was read from Bishop Penick, who was unable to attend due to illness.

The Courtesy Committee made the following report:

We, the members of the courtesy committee, in the name of all who have attended this inspiring and enlightening convention, wish to express our deep appreciation for the gracious hospitality which has made this meeting possible. In addition to the splendid program, it has been most uplifting to meet in the beautiful Chapel of the Cross, one of our oldest and most historical parishes in the South, situated in the heart of culture and learning. Especially are we grateful to the rector, the members of the hostess branch of the Auxiliary, and the entire membership of this Church.

To Miss Monteiro and to our own Miss Bessie Blacknall, native of this Diocese, for their moving and informative accounts of the Church at work in China and Alaska; to Canon Howitt for his devotional and instructive meditation, our sincere thanks.

To Bishop Tucker for presenting the modern missionary situation so clearly and for making us keenly aware of our personal responsibility in the spread of Christ's Kingdom we are deeply grateful.

To Mrs. Gordon for her zealous and consecrated leadership not only during this meeting but throughout her term of office, our heartfelt thanks.

We shall return to our homes with renewed fervor and faith that our undertakings in the cause of Christ may bear fruit, abundantly.

Mrs. Gordon made recognition of Miss Mary Frances Young, who is a mission worker assisting at Mayodan.

The minutes were read and approved.

Noon-day prayers were said.

The installation of the new president, Mrs. W. S. Holmes, followed. Rev. William J. Gordon led in this service, and pronounced the benediction and the Fifty-seventh Annual Meeting was adjourned.

EXTRACTS FROM THE NORTH CAROLINA CHURCHMAN  
CONCERNING THE ANNUAL MEETING 1939

**PRESIDING BISHOP, SPEAKERS FROM CANADA, ALASKA  
AND CHINA, INSPIRE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY ANNUAL  
MEETING IN CHAPEL HILL**

---

Miss Margaret Monteiro of the Diocese of Anking, China, in her vivid presentation of church work in China charged that newspaper atrocity stories emanating from the war zones are not only true, but if anything, under-statements of actual conditions. Miss Monteiro based her remarks upon 18 years' residence in the Orient, and upon reliable messages she has received from old friends in China since leaving on furlough. She emphasized the dangers and damages suffered by Chinese girls and women at the hands of Japanese soldiers.

The missionary appealingly depicted present conditions in her field, declaring that refugees were being sheltered in coal sheds, tool houses, sleeping on dining tables, and in short, rescued and housed in every conceivable way by Christian workers. Of 60 babies, wounded and sick and hungry, 47 were saved by heroic efforts at one refugee center. Faced with the appalling task of caring for 500 to 1,000 homeless Chinese in each make-shift station, one missionary's wife was heard to say longingly: "I wish this war would stop because I know I won't see my husband until it does. He goes wherever the war goes." Nanking, a city of 1,000,000 souls, today is a hull of its former self, and a scant 250,000 people remain within its confines. Miss Monteiro said Americans could and should do more to care for these stricken Orientals, many of them church folk, and that we should do all possible to promote legislation prohibiting export of scrap-iron and all war material.

Need for new workers in the mission fields was indicated by Miss Monteiro as she cited one group of 45 million Chinese residing in an area in which there is now only one American priest. (This remark was all the more significant in view of National Council's recent announcement that the outlook for 1939 may cause further reductions in personnel and salaries of missionaries.)

The Presiding Bishop of the Church in the United States, Bishop Tucker, of Virginia, broadcast on Thursday night through the courtesy of WDNC, Durham, and WPTF, Raleigh. He spoke on the modern incentive to do more and better missionary work, suggesting that nationalism in its worst form, and personal selfishness are the great stumbling blocks in the way of spreading the Gospel. He challenged his hearers to examine their own lives as to sincere desire to evangelize the world. Friday morning he made an informal address to the Auxiliary on the current reorganization being undertaken by National Council. He pointed out in both speeches, as did Miss Monteiro, that the war in China and Japan is paving the way for unlimited opportunities for mission work when the war ceases.

An 80-year-old canon of a Canadian cathedral, the Rev. F. E. Howitt, who belied his age in agility of thought and physical appearance, addressed a very attentive congregation on "The Grace of Our Lord Jesus Christ." Grace saves man, grace sanctifies man, and grace satisfies man, he said. He defined grace, among other definitions, as "The undeserved, unmerited favor of God." His wise and illuminating exposition was most profitable to all who heard it.

Miss Bessie Blacknall, native North Carolinian now stationed at St. Mark's School, Nenana, Alaska, made brief remarks of informal nature, describing her work with the forty boys and girls who live in the school. She said she personally dreaded the darkness rather than the cold of her adopted land. Alaskans have only 3 months of full daylight. Snow melts only in April, and flowers appear in May for a brief duration. Miss Blacknall told of the education of her charges, and said that many who have graduated are now reputable citizens in their respective communities.

**THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS TO THE  
CONVENTION OF 1939**

Members of the Woman's Auxiliary and Visitors:

A study of the reports of last year gives us much to be thankful for and offers to us a real challenge. Our financial gifts have been generous, there is an increasing effort for more systematic programs, the work of Christian Social Service has been definite and constructive, and I perceive beneath it all a wistful eagerness for a greater reality of the life of the Spirit.

Your president reports among her activities attendance at 19 branch meetings, 11 District meetings, 12 committee meetings, and she had part on the program of the Provincial meeting; she has led eight Quiet Days, spoken five times at St. Mary's School, made the twilight talks at the Vade Mecum Conference, given five meditations during a Mission at the Good Shepherd Church, Raleigh and made a report to the Diocesan Convention. She has also made Auxiliary addresses in the Diocese of Southwest Virginia, of Tennessee, of Atlanta, and of East Carolina and served on the faculty of the Kanuga Adult Conference.

We are met together in critical times, when truly "men's hearts are failing them for fear and for looking after those things which are coming on the earth". We face the amazing fact of the power of Satan active through the life of one man, of certain individuals. Insecurity is so great that it is closely akin to despair. But the Church has another message. I think it is not by chance that we are meeting in the Epiphany season. From the clouds of darkness around us, we lift our eyes to an old, yet ever new vision, a vision of Kings of the East, wise in that they left everything to find the Christ, traveling over a trackless desert, not dismayed by the wastes of sand but with their eyes upon a star, reaching their journey's end in the presence of a young Child whom they wor-

shipped and then they opened their treasures and presented unto Him gifts; gold and frankincense and myrrh. Now, these things "are written for our admonition". I do believe that if throughout this year, we should give the first place at all our Auxiliary meetings and in all our Auxiliary work, to worship, that we should come to its close with the sense of its having been the most blessed and fruitful year we have ever served. Then we too, would open our treasures and make our gifts of gold—gold which is so sorely needed in the extension of the Kingdom and we should offer our greater treasures—our sons and daughters—for the service of the King in this day of opportunity. We would offer Him the frankincense of unquestioning faith that "with Him nothing is impossible" and we should lay at His feet the costly myrrh of personal discipleship. Triumphant over evil will be the power of God as He expresses Himself through the lives of His servants. Tremendous possibilities are before us in this new year. Ours should be the prayer which has come to us out of China: "Lord, grant us miracles—miracles such as are within Thy will to give".

Three years ago I accepted your gift to me of this privilege of service in the words of St. Patrick,

"I bind unto myself today  
The strong arm of the Trinity".

With such unlimited resources, how small has been the use of them! There is a story that a certain monk of old, in his longing to present Christ, fashioned a crucifix. The result was very crude, but while he slept, an angel made of it a thing of beauty. May the Holy Spirit take the work of the past three years and so purify and ennoble it, that it may be acceptable unto Him Whom together we have served.

**CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE**

The most encouraging reports to come in to your secretary have been those which indicated work well thought out, well planned, and well executed. A Christian Social Service program to be of real value must contain these three elements: thought that is deep, spiritual, and searching in its quest for truth; planning that is carefully studied to meet the unfilled needs around us; and execution of those plans in a spirit of love for our fellowman.

There is an indication of a growing co-operation with the Social Agencies already existant in our communities, a realization that as Christians we have a great deal to offer which will supplement and fill out the usual social program, that there should never be a cleavage between the church and the agencies but a close and friendly relationship as we work together for our less fortunate brothers.

In our own institution, the Thompson Orphanage, this year there has been a re-awakening of interest on the part of the women throughout the Diocese. The response to the requests sent out by the Women's Co-operative Committee has been most generous and has helped not only in a material way but has buoyed up the spirit of the staff as well as the children.

A summary of activities in general is given elsewhere. One suggestion from a branch was that we not report all activities since they felt that in doing this, the real spirit was destroyed. May I say that we are not expected to report every little act of kindness, but those things done by the branches and kept in their records. Such a record is not for the purpose of getting credit nor for self emulation, but rather as a way by which we can measure our growth from year to year and also by which we can see whether as a group we are putting into practice those things we preach, whether we are making our faith live in works.

Finally, may I conclude with a reminder that the greatest thing in Christian Social Service is the spirit in which our deeds are done, that the "gift without the giver is bare". And may I quote from Margaret Bondfield that "holiness is an infinite compassion for others, that greatness is to take the common things of life and walk truly among them, and that happiness is a great love and a great service. Spiritual life does not begin in an arrogant attempt to change human beings; it begins in the recognition that human things can be very holy, full of God."

**REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY  
1938**

Again it is time that I report to you on the state of Christian Education in the Woman's Auxiliary. Out of a hundred and three branches only sixty six sent me any report. The figures in the various activities of this Department are about the same

except that the number of women attending summer conferences showed an increase.

Last year I reported to you that the need voiced by most secretaries, was how to get the women interested. That question is even more unanimous this year, and I think the thirty seven branches not reporting might be counted in on this. So, if we have one question which concerns a large majority of the branches that is the question which must be answered.

Mrs. Gordon suggested to me that I bring a fresh approach to the whole subject and I have taken her at her word. Do you not think it is time we brought a fresh approach? Shall we not try to find out why all this splendid material for study which comes to us from 281 fails to interest the women? Is there something basically wrong? If so, is the matter with us?

Let me give you a definition which Dr. McGregor has given, he said "Christian Education is learning to be at home with God."

In just how much have we learned to be at home with God?

What think ye of Jesus that is called the Christ? What did Jesus say about bringing in the Kingdom of Heaven? He said that nobody could bring it in except he should be born again.

Our church leaders have flung us this challenge over and over, and we have been inspired and uplifted by it, but what have we done about it? It seems to me that the point is this. These leaders can't do this thing for us, we have got to do it for ourselves. Being born again can't be accomplished by hearing sermons, by attending services, it can't be thought through, important and necessary as all these things are, they are not enough. Being born again is a process which has to be acted upon, every man for himself. Therefore I say to you that the Department of Christian Education needs Schools of Life Changing. These schools must be led by women like ourselves so that when we hear them say "this happened to me" we will know that if it could happen to them it could happen to us. They must be women whose lives have been changed, who have learned how to prepare their spirits for the Living Christ.

Our emphasis has been on the gathering of facts about what other people are doing for the Kingdom. What we need now is a study of ourselves and what we can do to bring in the Kingdom.

If any of you feel this need I stand ready to meet with you and make plans for Schools of Life Changing.

Only Christ can put a live interest into our work.

We all rejoice that the United Thank Offering for 1938 has again, as for the past several years, shown an increase amounting to \$272.32. This is especially gratifying as this is the first year of the Triennium. The United Thank Offering from the Auxiliary throughout the country is greater for this Triennium than at the same point in the Triennium of 1935-37—\$140,000 as compared with \$112,000.

When we realize how vital to the life of the church and of Christianity is the missionary work made possible by this offering, do we not all unite in the hope that in 1940 when the United Thank Offering is presented it will once again as in 1928 and 1931, exceed \$1,000,000?

A questionnaire submitted to all branches in the Diocese this Fall gave a gratifying picture of the way in which the offering is presented. In almost every case it is offered at a Corporate Communion; in many cases the rector gives a talk on the United Thank Offering. Practically all branches have at least one meeting a year devoted to the United Thank Offering and the majority use the literature sent out from the Church Missions House.

To the question "How many Auxiliary members use the Blue Box?" the average for those branches who replied was about 56%.

Here I feel lies the opportunity for advancement in the United Thank Offering work—to bring the Blue Box to the attention and the appreciation of the other 44% of our women. It is my own belief that this can best be done by personal contact—by those who know and love the Blue Box, making it understood by those who do not use it. For this United Thank Offering is not a power in the church only because of the missionary work it makes possible, but because of the spiritual growth it brings into the lives of those who make the offering. We cannot really use the Blue Box without enriching our spiritual life. Let me quote Bishop Whittlemore in conclusion: "The Blue Box is a very simple affair but it is the symbol of a process of interaction between the Divine and the human of which the fruit is a finely tempered and adjusted spirit."

Neville of Scotland Neck, was elected Supply Secretary and Mrs. F. G. Jarman, Roanoke Rapids, Educational Secretary.

Since for the past few years we have had no representatives at summer conferences, we are particularly glad to report that our district had four members to attend the conferences at Vade Mecum and Kanuga last summer. We hope to make our attendance larger next summer.

The district educational conference held in Tarboro, November 2nd, was of great value in presenting practical aids and suggestions for conducting study courses on India. Part of the day's program consisted of an expertly conducted discussion of program building. ### DISTRICT OF GRANVILLE

The first step taken by your chairman in beginning her term of office was the calling of a meeting of all the branch presidents of the district for a full afternoon conference. (Since this meeting the following appointments have been made: Mrs. Robert Smithwick, Louisburg, Supply Secretary; Mrs. J. P. Scoggins, Warrenton, Social Service Secretary; Mrs. C. A. Cole, Oxford, Chairman of Young People's Work).

We were indeed fortunate in having with us at this meeting Mrs. W. J. Gordon and her daughter, Miss Almeria Gordon, who has offered herself for missionary work; Miss Bessie Black-nall, and Rev. C. A. Cole, the new rector of St. Stephen's. The reports from the district secretaries showed increased interest especially in young people's work. ## COMMITTEE REPORTS

### RECRUITING GOING FORWARD

"These twelve Jesus sent forth and charged them saying— As ye go, preach saying, The Kingdom of heaven is at hand. Heal the sick, raise the dead, cleanse the lepers, cast out demons; freely ye received, freely give."

Preach, saying the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand. Brazil is asking for two priests. China needs at least one and Japan asks for six. Liberia and the Philippines each ask for one priest. Women of the Auxiliary, have you talked with one young man about these opportunities? Jesus never promised that His work will be easy; but tell these young men that Jesus has promised great blessings to all who receive His disciples, and that He will be a strong help and comfort through the hardships the disciples endure for His dear sake.

Heal the sick, raise the dead, cleanse the lepers, cast out demons. Jesus did all of these things in his brief ministry on earth, and He said "Greater works than these shall ye do". In cooperation with these priests we need evangelistic workers, teachers, doctors and nurses.

From the Church Missions House I learn there is a perennial appeal for young women with teaching ability who are trained for religious work among women and children. There are earnest appeals from China, Japan and the Philippines. Auxiliary women, have you told your college daughters and their friends so they are now taking special training for this work? Trained teachers with hearts aflame to give a Christian education are asked for in these fields. This year our Diocese has girls graduating and prepared to teach music and physical education. Do they know that St. Agnes School, Kyoto is asking for teachers in these subjects? Do we have sons in college in our Diocese who know that a man is wanted to teach English at St. Pauls University, Tokyo and another man is wanted for high school work in Brazil? As Auxiliary recruiters it is our privilege to make these facts known, not just generally, but to particular people.

From Church Missions House we learn "We never seem to be able to find nurses to care for the constant calls from the various fields". Alaska does so want a nurse to do public health work where there is no hospital, no helper, and no doctor. Only a stout hearted, self reliant, thoroughly Christ like woman who is ready for pioneer living conditions can be sent.

"He that findeth his life shall lose it; and he that loseth his life FOR MY SAKE shall find it."

Do you know church girls now in hospital training who can be told of the needs in China, in Japan, in Alaska, in Liberia? Who will answer the great variety of calls from St. Luke's Hospital, Japan and St. Luke's, Manila or Brent Hospital, the Philippines? All these calls are for nurses who have had supervisory experience and have ability to train student nurses. Can we find these young women in our Diocese?

Doctors are needed at St. Luke's Tokyo, and in China. No permanent arrangements have been made to replace Dr. Burke at Ft. Yukon. Only two short years ago Mrs. Burke was with us and told so joyously of Dr. Burke's work,—he was doctor, nurse, evangelist, teacher, priest, janitor and odd job man for every

need. How happy he must be in his present life; how prayerfully we must seek for another Dr. Burke.

What kind of young men and women can answer these calls? Here is the answer from the Church Missions House:

Those who go should be, preferably, between the ages of twenty-five and thirty-five. They should be free from family responsibilities here at home, and ready to devote a substantial number of years to the work, (an offer of life service is, of course, ideal). Ordinarily, our missionary bishops prefer to ask for the appointment of those who have had a year or so of actual experience in their chosen professions, but much depends upon the individual. It is particularly important that those who go out, be in the very best of health. Climatic and living conditions on the foreign field are not easy.

How shall we auxiliary members find ones who fulfill these requirements? We will look to the Young Peoples' Service League, to Vade Mecum, and to our home churches. We must keep close contact with our boys and girls at college, and we must be sure that we have trained leaders at home.

One of the many fine works last summer was a vacation Bible school conducted in three places by devoted college girls under the direction of a trained leader, Mary Frances Young. Local Sunday school teachers and leaders received training at these schools making them more capable leaders at home. It also led them to Vade Mecum and not only enthusiasm but marked increase in ability has resulted. We hope these summer schools may increase and that college boys may have the same privilege both for their own experience and good, but also because young men leaders at home need their training from the young men.

We must be ever building up more workers trained and ready to assist those already at work. This will be accomplished by our personal devotion to our Lord, in our own hearts, in our own homes, in our Church and schools. Then with hearts aglow we dare approach the young men and women of our Diocese who are so rich in life and love for our Master that they will joyously "leave all and follow Him". Jesus said "I am the light of the world". Only by receiving our light from Him can we fulfill His other saying "Ye are the light of the world".

### REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF THE COMMITTEE ON YOUNG PEOPLES' WORK

Four of the nine district secretaries of Young Peoples' work have sent in excellent reports and as these are no doubt typical of work in progress throughout the diocese, perhaps the "Highlights", from each report will give you a clear idea of the state of Young Peoples' Work in the Diocese of North Carolina.

It is gratifying to note that the secretaries seem to have "laid to heart" the eight things Miss Cutler listed as "Greatest needs" in her report last year, and to have set to work to do something about these needs.

The District of Orange reports Young Peoples' secretaries in six out of ten branches with Sunday Schools in eight branches, two of the Sunday Schools organized this year. Five branches have cradle rolls, six have Young Peoples' Service Leagues. Two of the Service Leagues were organized this year.

Nearly every branch had children at camp and adults at summer conferences.

There are several junior choirs and altar guilds. The District of Mecklenburg reports evidences everywhere of wonderful spirit in Sunday Schools and Service Leagues and realization of the opportunity of working with the children at the Thompson Orphanage.

To the District of Edgecombe goes the distinction of having a Sunday School in every branch, the only one so far to make such a report. Another interesting experiment from this same district, Roanoke Rapids Sunday School has an auxiliary member who acts as Sunday School Mother, visiting the sick, looking up absent members and other "motherly" offices. At Halifax the young people of the town have a Union League made up of members from all the churches.

Four Auxiliary members from Edgecombe attended summer conferences.

The District of Richmond reports that each branch has a secretary of Young Peoples' Work. At Southern Pines there is active work with the Girl Scouts. From Hamlet comes the word, "There now exists a closer relationship and understanding between the Young Peoples' Service League and the Auxiliary". The church school in Wadesboro has again increased its enrollment. A striking quotation from this report reads, "The ladies seem to realize that they not only can help the Young People but also they can be helped by the Young People."

No doubt you have already read, with interest, in the North Carolina Churchman of the excellent work done by the rector in Wadesboro in organizing the work for under privileged youth. Quoting from the same report words that we may all well adopt as our ideal in this, our work with young people, "Here we have our young people working for other young people, the Auxiliary working for the young people and the young people working for the Auxiliary, and all working together to bring our youth into the way which leads to Him."

No doubt just as interesting things are happening in the Districts of Granville, Wake, Guilford, Forsyth-Rowan and the negro district.

There are two things of particular interest to workers with young people that have recently happened. One is the publication of a newspaper called *The Chimes*, published by the Young Peoples' Service League of the Province of Sewanee containing news of great interest and valuable program material for Young Peoples' Service Leagues. The other is a page in the *Spirit of Missions* called the Young People in the Church.

Let us give both of these publications the careful consideration which they merit.

In making our plans for the new year let us take the last verse of the Service League hymn and make it our constant prayer, knowing that He will show us what He would have us do.

"Feed us dear Lord that we may rise victorious,  
Filled with the power that comes from Thee alone,  
Fired with zeal, we face life's challenge glorious,  
Eager to know the Christ and make Him known."

As you know, you have on your list the names of six active missionaries and one missionary on indefinite leave—Miss Disbrow.

Would it not be possible for you to arrange for the group who had Deaconess Sime to share one of the perfectly splendid group of missionaries on your list?"

Shall we not add to our prayers for our missionary Prayer Partners a prayer for ourselves at home, that we may be inspired to make possible the sending of more missionaries, that there may be "enough to go around"?

### REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN WORK AMONG THE ISOLATED

According to the definition given by the National Council of our Church the work among the Isolated includes all those who are separated from the fellowship of the Church for any reason, i.e., distance, sickness, invalidism, and poverty. I feel however that this definition causes an overlapping with the Department of Christian Social Relations and should therefore be confined exclusively to those who are separated by distance. This means that our work in this department, if the above suggestion is accepted, will be among those who live in the rural districts and in the small communities where no Episcopal Church is located.

Before taking up this work with the various Branches I personally explored the possibilities in this field within the immediate vicinity of my Parish and wrote a letter to each Branch outlining my methods and findings.

This work is of such nature that it can be accomplished only by the various Parishes and Missions working in their own areas. As a beginning I have asked that each Branch appoint a Chairman specifically in charge of this work. In the near future it is my hope that the Diocese can be divided into sections and each Auxiliary assigned a particular area for which they will be responsible. This method will avoid an overlapping in the work and tend to increase the sense of responsibility each Branch will feel for its assigned section.

On brief acquaintance with the work among the Isolated I have discovered already that there are a great number of Episcopalians who, with a little effort on our part, can be brought

into much closer fellowship with their Church. This is our obligation and duty, a definite phase of our Missionary work at home. Therefore, I beg of you that you send me the names of our Chairmen so I may write them, arrange for periodic reports, and begin work on the organization essential to the success of this program.

**REPORT OF REPRESENTATIVE ON LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL**

At the annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary last year in Rocky Mount, your representative on the Legislative Council presented a six point legislative platform which was adopted by the Auxiliary.

This platform has been presented to the Legislative Council and every point endorsed by that body.

As Christian people we should be concerned with legislation which will make a better state in which to live and help the more unfortunate members of society.

The men whom we elect to make our laws represent us and want to carry out our wishes if they understand what those wishes are.

Each one of us can do her part in letting them know that we are interesting in legislation which affects public welfare and in order to talk intelligently we should inform ourselves. We should know what our state is doing for the good of humanity and how much more needs to be done.

How many of us know that more money is needed for the proper care of the tubercular, the feeble minded and the insane? Do we know that people mentally ill have actually been kept in jails because of lack of space in the State Hospital? Could they ever be cured under such conditions? The State is at present putting up more buildings. An appropriation is needed for more doctors and attendants to care for the inmates of these new buildings.

Are we familiar with the splendid program endorsed by the State Board of Health?

Do we know that last year approximately 1,000 children under 16 years of age were held in North Carolina county jails because of inadequate facilities in boarding home care? These children who have committed crimes must either be put in with hardened criminals, or sent back to the families in whose circles they have learned to do evil unless more space is made available in our schools of correction.

Do we know that many children in our towns during school hours are begging on our streets, shop lifting in our stores? Not all of these, but perhaps a goodly number if they were kept in school would get some idea of fair play and at least learn enough to make an honest living.

We need a more efficient enforcement of the law requiring compulsory attendance at school. This is at present under the State Department of Public Welfare. This department does the very best it can but is not equipped to do this work in addition to taking care of all its other responsibilities. This should be a part of the program of the Department of Education and enough allowed in its budget for this work.

Let us give these young people a chance in life. They did not choose their shiftless parents, too ignorant or too careless to send them to school. Even as little children they are doomed unless our citizens through their representatives say, "They shall be North Carolina citizens. Give them an opportunity to be assets to our beloved state."

In recent years there has been a tendency to liberalize the divorce laws of North Carolina. We who believe in the sanctity of the home, should look upon this with alarm. We do not know

at what time some one for selfish or personal reasons will get a bill through making divorce even easier than at the present time. Our representatives should be prepared to stop any such effort and know that our women are standing behind them 100 percent.

Most of you know personally members of the legislature from your district. A friendly talk over these measures in which we are interested would help. You have elected these men to represent you. Give them a chance to do so intelligently.

## CONSTITUTION

### ARTICLE I

#### Name

The name of this organization shall be, "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

### ARTICLE II

#### Object

The object of this organization shall be to help in carrying out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church; Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service.

### ARTICLE III

#### Membership

The membership of this organization shall be composed of all Parish and Mission Branches within the Diocese.

### ARTICLE IV

#### Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: a President, a Vice-President, who is also Secretary of the Supply Department, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of the Department of Religious Education, a Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service, and a Custodian of the United Thank Offering.

Section 2. These officers, with the District Chairmen, shall constitute the Executive Committee and shall meet at least twice a year at the call of the President.

### ARTICLE V

#### Duties of the Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for. She shall also preside at meetings, and at every Annual Meeting shall address the Auxiliary. She shall make a report to the Diocesan Convention.

Section 2. The Vice-President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have charge of the Supply Department.

Section 3. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist the President in preparing and having printed the Annual Report, and at each Annual Meeting shall make a report.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering and Box Work money, and shall make a report of same at the Annual Meeting. At the end of every fiscal year, the Treasurer's accounts shall be verified by a public auditor. The Treasurer's report, as audited, shall be published in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Section 5. The Secretary of the Department of Religious Education shall promote and stimulate educational work in the branches of the Diocese by every means in her power, and carry out the program of the National Department of Religious Education.

Section 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service shall co-operate with the Christian Social Service

Departments of the Diocese and of the National Council, in the promotion of their plans and programs.

Section 7. The Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in the Spring and Fall of each year, and shall remit immediately for investment, to the Treasurer of the National Council.

## **ARTICLE VI**

### **Term of Office**

Section 1. All Diocesan Officers shall be elected for a term of three years; the President to be elected at the Second Annual Meeting after the Triennial; the Treasurer, the Secretary of the Department of Religious Education and the Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service, the third meeting after the Triennial; and the Vice-President and the United Thank Offering Custodian, the first meeting after the Triennial. No officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms. Vacancies occurring during the year shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President for one year.

## **ARTICLE VII**

### **Districts**

Section 1. For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into Districts.

Section 2. A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman, duly elected by her District, for a term of three years. In case of vacancy, the District Supply Secretary shall serve as Chairman.

Section 3. Each District shall hold at least one, and if possible, two meetings, a year.

## **ARTICLE VIII**

### **Election of Diocesan Officers**

Section 1. Prior to the Annual Meeting, the President shall appoint from the Executive Board a nominating committee of three who shall consider proposed nominees to fill the elective offices at the Meeting, and from the names suggested or considered the Committee shall recommend to the Meeting the nominees for such offices. The consent of the nominees shall be obtained by the Committee before making the recommendation. Nominations may be made from the floor of the Meeting by any delegate provided the consent of the nominees has been first obtained. A majority vote shall be required for all elections. In case there are more than two nominees for the same office and no candidate receives a majority vote, the name receiving the smallest number of votes shall be dropped from the ballot.

Section 2. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund for the Calendar Year preceding the meeting.

## **ARTICLE IX**

### **Finance**

The Executive Committee in consultation with the Bishop shall prepare a budget for the year. This budget shall be presented to the branches for their support at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Section 2. From the total amount pledged towards the budget, one-half shall apply to the work of the National Council, one-half to the work of the Diocese.

Section 3. The United Thank Offering and contributions for the Supply Department shall be in addition to the payments on the budget.

## **ARTICLE X**

### **Amendments**

This Constitution may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present, provided a written copy of the proposed amendments has been filed with the Diocesan Secretary, and a notice of same mailed to each branch by the Secretary at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting.

### **BY-LAWS**

The place and time of the Annual Meeting shall be approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

1. The order of Business for the Annual Meeting shall be arranged by the President and the Executive Committee.

2. Each Parish Branch having fifty members or less shall be represented by the Branch President and one other delegate (appointed by the President or elected by the Branch). The President, or her representative, and the delegates each has a vote. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the Branch to an additional delegate with power to vote.

3. Each Branch shall be assessed twenty-five cents per member to provide for Provincial Expenses, printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of Speakers, and other items necessary for the proper administration of this organization. This shall be known as the Central Fund.

4. One-fourth of the Branches having the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at the Annual Meeting. Five members shall constitute a quorum at the Executive Committee Meetings.

5. Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be the authority in all questions of Parliamentary law not covered by these By-Laws.

6. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates at any Annual Meeting.

## FOREWORD

---

To have is to have a responsibility; to own is to owe to those who are in need of what we have. St. Paul stated that he was in debt to the Greeks and the barbarians, that he owed them that which had been intrusted to him — the Gospel of Christ, the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth. The condition of the wounded man in the Parable of the Good Samaritan placed an obligation on all traveling nearby to care for him. The medical profession feels that it owes its knowledge to the world in need, the noble tradition of those who go down to the sea in ships demands that all who can do so go to the aid of a vessel in distress, the responsibility of those who have this world's goods to those suffering from the consequences of earthquake, fire, and flood is noted in the confident appeal of the Red Cross expecting relief for the disaster-stricken. The Christian owes material help where it is needed, but he owes more — the Gospel of Christ. Money for the United Thank Offering and clothing for the Supply Department should be presented, but the offering should not stop there. In addition to the loaf of bread given in the Master's Name should be the Bread of Life. Auxiliary work should include leading people to Baptism, bringing into the way of truth those who have erred, teaching of the faith once delivered to the saints, and seeking the lost until they are found.

## Excerpt from The North Carolina Churchman

Mrs. James R. Cain, member of the National Council, from Upper South Carolina, spoke on "World Christian Fellowship." She said that it was the conclusion of the Madras Conference that permanent peace for the world was dependent on our consideration for other people. That in this all people could help, by using every means we had at hand, our time, our minds, our thoughts, and our prayers. That musicians, artists, speakers, teachers, laborers of all kinds, no matter what the race or citizenship, by using what they have of talents, can do their part in accomplishing this Fellowship, and do much toward bringing an end to World Strife. Fellowship, Brotherhood, and Unity are the Gift of God and each one of us can help to bring about this condition in the world. It is through our deeds rather than by our words that we can share in this.

The climax of the day's intensive consideration of things pertaining to the successful carrying out of the work of the Auxiliary, was the annual charge of Bishop Penick, in which he took St. Paul as the theme of his address. He told of the annual procession of Christians from Damascus, the oldest town in the world, to the traditional site of St. Paul's Conversion, where there is always the reading of the Acts of the Apostles where is told the story of the conversion of Saul the zealous Jew whose one purpose at that time was to destroy Christians.

God speaks to each person in the language that he understands and so it was an indication of His own intensity of feeling. In other instances he used the same repetition: Judas, Judas—Peter, Peter—Saul, Saul. He said that in all these instances there was something pathetic about His Whys—"Why hast thou persecuted me?"

Though there was pathos in his questioning—there was no reproach, no condemnation, no rebuke, only Eternal Love's overture in His "Why?"

Christ identifies himself with suffering people, with children, with the sorrowful. That in following in His footsteps, as Bessie Blacknall in Alaska, Mary Wood Mackenzie in Africa, and many others are doing, all are paying the debt to God through Love. Whatever we do for any one in love we do it for God. When it is not done, it is passing Jesus by. Here again the Bishop gave warning lest in doing the mechanical thing we lose sight of opportunities of giving Love in service.

The first question St. Paul asked was "What wilt Thou have me to do?" But Jesus did not tell him what to do. He only told him to go and find out for himself. "Thus," he said, "we must find out what Jesus wants us to do, by doing the nearest duty, and one at a time. When we help suffering humanity we are helping Him. When we give a cup of cold water to one in distress we are giving it to Him.

This then is my prayer and charge to you he said, "TAKE ONE STEP AT A TIME."

## ANNUAL MEETING 1940

*Keynote: Fellowship in Worship*

The Fifty-eighth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Diocese of North Carolina convened Wednesday morning, January 24, at 10:45, in St. Luke's Church, Salisbury. The opening prayers were led by Rev. E. B. Guerry, rector of the parish.

The meeting was called to order by the president, Mrs. W. S. Holmes.

Mrs. Claude Morris of the hostess branch extended greetings. Response was made by Miss Claudia Hunter of Henderson.

The Secretary took the chair while the President made her address.

The following committees were appointed:

Nominating—Mrs. J. A. Mackie, Mrs. Fred Drane, Miss Emma Hall.

Elections—Mrs. I. Harding Hughes, Mrs. Francis Clarkson, Mrs. H. E. Olive.

Resolutions—Mrs. Howard Hartzell, Mrs. H. C. Bourne, Mrs. George Lyon.

Findings—Mrs. H. B. Hutchison, Mrs. E. L. Hardin, Mrs. Ralph Bridges.

Courtesy—Mrs. R. T. B. Little, Mrs. C. A. Cole, Mrs. W. H. Stratford.

Finance—Mrs. J. A. Mackie, Mrs. U. T. Holmes, Miss Sallie Grimes.

At this time Mrs. Holmes presented Mrs. Frank S. Spruill, past president, and Miss Lillie Hill, Diocesan missionary.

The reports of the Diocesan officers were given and accepted. The report of the Vice-President and Supply Secretary, Mrs. C. Gordon Smith, was read by the Secretary. Her resignation was announced as having been accepted by the Executive Board and that Miss Corinna Gant, of Burlington, had been appointed to fill her unexpired term. The acting Secretary, Mrs. E. E. Easley, read the report of the regular Secretary, Mrs. C. M. Swart, who was absent due to illness. Mrs. J. A. Mackie,

Treasurer, made a splendid report, showing all pledges paid for the year and a balance of \$2,313.30, which had been allocated by the Executive Board as follows:

\$450, or the amount needed to build a cabin with water at Vade Mecum.

\$50 to help defray expenses of Counselor's Institute for Y.P.S.L.

\$10 for the Progress Award Banner for Y.P.S.L.

\$100 toward the retiring fund for Deaconesses.

\$100 to the Church Refugee Fund.

\$500 for Anvik, Alaska, to be used at the discretion of Rev. H. H. Chapman and Mrs. Susan Smith Chapman. This amount was diverted from the fund for the nurse in Anvik by vote of the convention.

The budget for 1941 of \$7,400 was proposed and accepted, this being an increase of \$300 within the diocese and \$300 outside the diocese.

The report of the Secretary of Christian Education, Mrs. W. Lunsford Long, was read. Mrs. Francis Clarkson, Secretary of Christian Social Relations, presented her report. Mrs. U. T. Holmes, Jr., read her report. All these were accepted to be printed in the Year Book.

Rev. W. S. Stoney, of Morganton, said the noon-day prayers and made a talk on "Worship in Meditation", giving helpful suggestions.

Bishop Penick offered a resolution that a message be sent to Rev. John L. Jackson, Bishop-elect of Louisiana, congratulating him and assuring him of our prayers as he makes his decision. Bishop Penick then offered a prayer for him.

The president reported that greetings had been sent the Woman's Auxiliary of East Carolina in convention assembled and congratulations to Bishop Darst on his twenty-fifth anniversary.

Mrs. Baxter Moore, chairman of the Committee to Study Re-organization, made report. All recommendations were accepted and will appear in the Year Book.

Bishop Penick pronounced the benediction and the meeting was adjourned for luncheon.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION, JANUARY 24

The meeting reconvened at 2:15 p. m. with the singing of hymn 493.

Mrs. James R. Cain, member of the National Council, made an address on "World Christian Fellowship", stressing the need of our re-thinking all relations in the world today.

Mrs. F. H. Leavitt, provincial chairman of the Department of Promotion, sent greetings. A loving message from Miss Emma Hall was read. Greetings were read from St. Bartholomew's Parish, Pittsboro.

The Credentials Committee reported 32 accredited delegates—19 branches represented, being a quorum.

The roll was called.

Upon the report of the Nominating Committee, elections proceeded, resulting as follows:

Treasurer—Miss Sallie Grimes, of Salisbury.

Secretary Christian Education—Mrs. E. G. Peoples, Oxford.

Vice President—Mrs. Harvey B. Hutchison, Winston-Salem.

Nominees for membership on Executive Council—Mrs. W. J. Gordon for three year term; Mrs. George Watts Carr to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. V. Ben White.

The following delegates and alternates were elected for the triennial meeting in Kansas City: Mrs. W. S. Holmes, Mrs. U. T. Holmes, Jr., Mrs. Francis Clarkson, Mrs. Wm. J. Gordon, Mrs. Ross Sigmon. Alternates—Mrs. E. J. Wannamaker, Jr., Mrs. E. A. Penick, Mrs. E. G. Peoples, Mrs. E. E. Easley.

Reports were read from the following committee chairmen: Mrs. Fred Drane, Prayer Partnership Plan; Mrs. W. F. Upshaw, Legislative; Mrs. E. G. Peoples, Young People's Work; Mrs. S. P. Morrill, Work with the Isolated.

Mrs. Holmes announced the appointment of Mrs. Irving Hall to succeed Mrs. Upshaw, whose term has expired.

At this time, Mrs. Holmes welcomed Mrs. W. J. Gordon, past president and Miss Betty Gordon, Diocesan missionary, who arrived during the day.

Rev. C. E. B. Robinson pronounced the benediction, and an informal tea was held in the parish house with the Guild of Mary and Martha as hostesses. A missionary exhibit was displayed.

## EVENING SERVICE

The evening service was held in the church. Evening prayers were read by the rector of the parish. The choir led in the singing of hymns and a beautiful offertory anthem was sung. Bishop Penick expressed his gratification at having as the preacher of the evening a neighbor and friend, Bishop R. E. Gribbin, of the Diocese of Western North Carolina. He preached a stirring missionary sermon.

## THURSDAY MORNING, JANUARY 25

There was a celebration of the Holy Communion at 9 o'clock Thursday morning, Bishop Penick being the celebrant, assisted by the Rev. E. B. Guerry and Rev. A. S. Lawrence, Jr. Roll of remembrance was read.

The business session opened at 10 a. m. Prayers were said by Rev. D. W. Allen.

A telegram was read from Rev. John L. Jackson, expressing his appreciation for the message sent him from the convention.

Reports of Diocesan objectives followed.

Miss Mary Dabney Jones presented St. Mary's School. She spoke to us of the contribution the school is making both from a material and spiritual standpoint.

Mrs. Francis Clarkson discussed the work the Auxiliary is doing at Thompson Orphanage through the Cooperative Committee.

The following resolutions were recommended by the Committee on Resolutions and duly adopted:

Resolved: That the U. T. O. Custodian be automatically a representative to the Triennial just as the President is.

Resolved: That the Finance Committee, in consultation with the Bishop and Executive Board, be given authority in extreme necessity to adjust any item in the budget.

Resolved: That all money except U. T. O. go through the Treasurer.

Resolved: That reading of minutes at meetings be an outline of proceedings rather than full minutes.

Resolved: That all past presidents be delegates to every Annual Convention.

Resolved: That the date of the Annual Convention be in the spring.

Resolved: Whereas, the Administrative Fund is sufficient to care for convention expenses, be it resolved that the offering from this convention be sent to Miss Mary Wood McKenzie with affectionate greetings from the convention, meeting in her home church.

Resolved: That Mrs. Swart's absence be noted, and request the Secretary to write a note of regret.

Rev. A. S. Lawrence, Jr., represented Vade Mecum. He expressed his gratitude to the women of of the Auxiliary for their contribution to Vade Mecum.

William Gordon, President of the Y.P.S.L., was presented. He thanked the Auxiliary for its continued interest.

Bishop Penick gave his annual charge to the Auxiliary. He impressed upon us the individuality of God's call and the importance of ministering to suffering humanity in Christ's name, urging that we be obedient to His call.

Rev. I. Harding Hughes introduced Rev. A. B. Parson, Associate Secretary of Foreign Missions, who addressed us on the Madras Conference. He gave the personnel of the conference, its purpose and accomplishments.

Noon-day prayers were said by Bishop Penick.

Mrs. H. B. Hutchison, Chairman of the Committee on Findings, presented the following report:

#### REPORT OF FINDINGS COMMITTEE

1. That the great number who braved the elements to attend this Convention have found a closeness of fellowship and warmth of Spirit which should radiate from this group into a wide spread of influence, and building towards unity.

2. That we should be grateful to our President for her consecrated leadership, and that it is largely through her earnestness and prayers that we have gone forward in the work of the Auxiliary and attained a real "Fellowship in Worship."

3. That in the noonday meditation Rev. Mr. Stoney gave us most helpful suggestions on "Meditation in Worship." He pointed to that form of Spiritual exercise where we experience a real relationship with God; when we listen to what He has to say; and then do something about it.

4. That the Summary of Christian Social Relations shows a deeper insight into that field of Service, and points the way to a clearer vision of the road ahead.

5. That the Secretary of Education and of Young People's Work declare that we must make a program compelling enough and in-

teresting enough to inspire us with desire to know more of what our Church is attempting to do.

6. That the United Thank Offering increase is encouraging in that the monetary value is an outward expression of Spiritual growth.

7. That illness prevented Miss Hall's being present, but her report shows continued growth in the work in the Negro district.

8. That the report from the Thompson Orphanage indicates a continuing and sustaining interest in the care of our children.

9. That we are grateful to the Committee on Re-organization of the Constitution for clarifying and simplifying the administration of the Auxiliary's work.

10. That the advancing interest and participation in the Church's work by the Young People is an encouraging result of Church Schools, Camps and Summer Conferences.

11. That Mrs. Cain brought us face to face with world problems and made us realize that we are called to leadership in building a World Christian Community; and that in our deeds and gifts lies the answer to those problems.

12. That Bishop Gribbin has given us a forceful challenge to discharge the debt which we, who have Christ, owe to those who have not known our Saviour, not minimizing material giving, but emphasizing spiritual giving, and reminding us that all we can do is not enough to repay for our wonderful Christian heritage.

13. That Bishop Penick gave us a practical application of a meditation that will be helpful to advance in our prayer life; that he brought us to realize the intimacy of our relationship with God, in that He speaks to each of us personally and individually; and in our own tongue, and that our ministry to Christ's needy is ministry to Him.

14. That Mr. Parson has made us conscious of the Madras Conference; its origin, its personnel, and the part we may have in bringing about "The Kingdom of God."

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO STUDY ORGANIZATION

Your committee appointed to study organization respectfully reports that it has carefully considered the present organization and offers the following resolutions:

1. Resolved: That Article IV of the Constitution (Officers) shall be amended to read: a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary of Christian Education, a Secretary of Christian Social Relations, a Secretary of Supply, a Custodian of United Thank Offering.

2. Resolved: That Article V of the Constitution (Duties of Officers) shall be amended to read: Section 2—the Vice-President shall act in the absence of the President and shall (a) have specific duties to be decided in conference with the President. Section 8—The Secretary of Supply shall have charge of the work of the Supply Department. Section 8—No change in words, but number changed from 7 to 8.

3. Resolved: That Article VI of the Constitution (Term of Office) shall be amended to read: Section 1—all diocesan officers shall be elected for a term of three years; the President to be elected at the first Annual Meeting after the Triennial and to take office at the close of the second Annual Meeting after the Triennial; a United Thank Offering Custodian, the first Annual Meeting after the Triennial; a Secretary of Supply and a Secretary of Christian Social Relations, the second Annual Meeting after the Triennial; a Vice-President, a Treasurer, and a Secretary of Christian Education, the third Annual Meeting after the Triennial.

4. Resolved: That Article VII of the Constitution (Districts) shall be amended to read: Section 2—A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman duly elected by her District, for a term of three years. In case of vacancy, the Vice-Chairman of the District shall serve as Chairman.

Your committee further recommends the addition of the following By-Laws:

1. By-Law 5 to read: The Diocesan President shall appoint at the beginning of her second year of office, the following chairmen to serve for three years: 1. Chairman Church Periodical Club; 2. Inter-racial Chairman; 3. Legislative Chairman; 4. Missionary Correspondent; 5. Chairman of Young People's Work.

2. No. 6—The District officers shall correspond to the Diocesan officers and shall be elected at the first meeting of the District after the Diocesan Convention. And the District Chairman shall appoint the following chairmen to serve for three years: 1, Chairman of Church Periodical; 2, Prayer Partner Chairman; 3, Chairman of Young People's Work.

3. That present By-Law 5 shall become No. 7, and that By-Law 6 shall become No. 8.

#### THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS TO THE CONVENTION OF 1940

It is my privilege to add to Miss Hunter's response to the courteous greetings, the very deep appreciation that your President feels for all that is being done for our comfort and convenience in this hospitable parish. The welcome is very real to all of us who have enjoyed it on other occasions. To me, personally, it is very much like coming home. It was in this church that my first experience of a district meeting was had. The former rector was a close friend and often an honored guest in our home, and the father of your present rector held that place when our home was in his diocese. So there is a peculiar fitness to my mind, in coming to this church at the end of my first year as your president, to give an accounting of my stewardship amid sympathetic surroundings. It has been a year filled with rich privileges for me in the contacts made possible because of my office. I am conscious of many mistakes made by me, but feel that I shall profit by their warning and I pray that our second year may be one of real understanding of the import of our reason for being so that the Kingdom of God will be advanced through us as an Auxiliary. There comes to me a vision of strength when I see nearly four thousand women banded together in this diocese to promote the program of the National Council through whose guidance we endeavor to carry out the thought of the Church assembled in General Convention, triennially.

We are in the third year of this triennium, now: we have increased in numbers and gifts; I believe we have grown in knowledge and understanding. But we are not yet the united force we should be. From your answers to the questionnaire sent to you and returned to me I have gathered some facts that I would give to you for your prayerful consideration. A little more than 50 per cent of our women are actively interested in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary. Is that sufficient, or does it

represent to us a real opportunity? A good proportion of you say that we have a sufficiently challenging program to interest all women. Where lies the lack of interest then? Can it be lack of fellowship whereby we might make our purpose and plans known to every woman? Let us try to get to the root of the cause for having to report almost half un-interested. Perhaps we are not as sure ourselves of what we believe to be the Lord's work. We can be guided in this through prayerful study of His Word.

There are reported only fifteen Bible Study Classes sponsored by Auxiliary branches. While we know that this does not cover the number of women who study the Bible and who belong to groups studying, still I consider it an indication of something we might add to our future plans.

I feel overwhelmed with the generosity evident in the gifts of our Diocesan branch. Year by year we have more than kept our pledges. We come again to the end of another year, with a balance in the treasury. That fact together with our increase in membership, makes your Finance Committee bold to recommend an increase in our budget to be adopted for 1941.

One thing I urgently commend to you is that gifts be sacramental, that is, that what we offer to God is truly a return of what He has blessed you with. A sacrament is an outward, visible sign of an inward spiritual grace. Our gifts should be an outward sign of the grace within us that makes us desire to glorify God and to give Him the first fruits of our labor, our time, our intellect, our whole being. We offer and present unto Him ourselves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable sacrifice unto Him.

During this year of the Triennium we are asked to meditate on the "Fellowship of the Holy Spirit." Let us open our hearts to Him that He may lead us into all truth.

### REPORT OF SUPPLY SECRETARY FOR 1939

The work in the Supply Department has been most efficiently done throughout the Diocese. The garments made are most attractive, and are really so pretty and made so beautifully that none of us would mind using them for ourselves or families. There is just one suggestion I would like to leave with you regarding the underclothes that are made, and that is to see if they can't be made with a little finish of lace, or colored bias binding, or something like this to make them a little more attractive. Some of the branches are already doing this, and I can't help feeling that the Missionaries who receive these prettier garments get just a little more thrill.

There are a great many branches who don't send in their dues and do no sewing. Will each person here please make herself a Committee of One to go home and report this to her Branch and see that this is corrected? Another thing, please have a program on the Supply Department. I sent to each District Chairman last November material to be used in a program of this sort. I hope she has sent this material to each of her branches.

We have sent more boxes to Missions this year than last year, and after filling all assignments I had so many garments on hand

I asked Mrs. Wade for additional assignments. She sent me two, one for Alaska and one for Kentucky.

During 1939 we sent money or boxes to three Missionaries for Christmas, two boxes of personal clothes to Missionaries, money for a suit to an Indian Catechist, and four boxes of clothing and other supplies to Missions.

The second-hand clothes that have been sent by the different branches have been most gratefully received and appreciated, and I hope you will continue to send these boxes whenever you have a chance to do so.

I find it necessary to give up the work as Supply Secretary, but before I leave office I want to thank each of you for your co-operation and helpfulness, and to ask that you give to my successor the same loyal support.

### REPORT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS CHAIRMAN 1939

As we come to the end of one year and the beginning of another, we look back, not simply to see what we have done in this year, but to measure how far along the road we have come. And we look forward to see the road that lies ahead.

The Christian Social Relations Program is so broad in its scope and so varied in its application that the reports from the branches present, not a dull mass of statistics, but an interesting and varied account of attempts to practice the teachings of

Christ in all human relationships. The sweet simplicity and homeliness of some may serve to bring us back to the every day practice of our Christianity, while the real pioneering qualities of others may arouse in us a fresh enthusiasm and a broader vision.

There is evident quite a feeling that "charity begins at home." One of the large branches is emphasizing friendly visiting and fellowship within the parish. Others report taking to church services those who cannot otherwise get there, from the young college students to the old inhabitants of the county home. One branch tells of the sending of "one of our oldest members on a trip Christmas to see her invalid daughter whom she has not seen in two years."

Co-operation between the church and the local agencies seems to be growing. Many groups are using their trained community workers for advice and consultation and are working closely with them. This is of particular importance where direct relief is given, and also in work through established institutions. Several are co-operating with local doctors and public health nurses by furnishing maternity kits and loan closets.

One bit of work which was reported several years ago in the field of pioneering, the beginning of a venereal clinic, has now passed beyond that stage. It is well established and has been turned over to a regular agency. How many unexplored fields await us!

In Thornton Wilder's play, "Our Town," the stage manager says, "Everybody knows that somethin' is eternal. And it ain't houses, and it ain't names, and it ain't earth, and it ain't even stars. There is somethin' way down deep that's eternal about every human being. Aren't they all waitin' for the eternal part in them to come out clear?"

And after all, isn't that what our program is for? To remove the clouds of poverty, of physical disabilities, of social injustice, or whatever it may be, that "the eternal part in them may come out clean."

Remember this, if you were different you could make her different. If you are not on fire for Christ, don't put the blame on other people. Get busy first of all to find that fire yourself.

Quote: "The only answer to flaming churches in Spain and Russia is the Church aflame."

May I repeat here the questionnaire which went out with the report blanks?

How many broken homes have been saved through your efforts?

How many sick souls have been healed in mind or body through contact with you?

How many problem children have you set on the right track?

How many people have you been the means of bringing to a personal experience of Christ and surrender to Him?

In what other ways have you been used to re-arm Christ's followers for the struggle with the forces of darkness?

A question which came back in response to these, was: "Does it not take special training to do some of the things outlined?"

My answer is, Yes, it does take special training, and another series of questions.

Where should we get this training?

Are we beginning to think that only the colleges can train us?

Is it not much more the business of the Church?

Are we sure the colleges are training us correctly?

Is the training the Church might give us necessarily along the lines of the colleges?

Are these things as much my business as a minister's or a social worker's?

Is our emphasis on social workers a danger to our own spiritual life?

As I go out of office I ask you, not to take up these questions but to be taken by them.

### REPORT OF UNITED THANK OFFERING FOR 1939

In this the fiftieth year in the history of the United Thank Offering the women of the Diocese of North Carolina have offered \$6,548.39, \$52 less than in the year 1938. I am told that it is not unusual for the Offering to decrease in the second year of the triennium, but I must admit some disappointment because I had believed that more women were learning to use the Blue Box, that more women were sharing in this great sacrificial Offering that makes possible so much of the missionary work of our Church.

Although there is this slight decrease in the Offering for this year, I am glad to report that this Diocese has to its credit for this triennium \$13,418.54. In less than a year from now the United Thank Offering will be presented at the Triennial meeting in Kansas City. If we give as much in 1940 as we did this year, our total will be slightly over \$20,000, which amount we gave in 1928.

I do not like to stress the monetary value of the United Thank

Offering because I believe its spiritual significance is potentially as great. If we think of every penny of this offering as representing the prayers of our women, prayers of thankfulness to a Loving Father, prayers asking for His blessing upon the workers in the field and upon his children everywhere, we know what a force it has been in this tortured world. Nevertheless we cannot fail to hope for a generous amount of money because we know the need is so urgent and the opportunity so great. I ask your help in winning more of our Church women for their own sakes and the world's sake to share in our United Thank Offering.

### DUTIES OF DISTRICT CHAIRMEN

### THE DISTRICT OF EDGECOMBE

The District of Edgcombe held its regular meetings in Spring and Fall and an executive board meeting in March of last year. The Spring Meeting was outstanding for us in that it was a homecoming for our own Laura Clark who spoke to us of her work in China.

Feeling that the deepest concern of the Auxiliary should be the suffering of nations and races that are victims of war and persecution, we gave part of our Fall offering to the Refugee Orphan's Fund.

Only one member from the District attended the Vade Mecum Auxiliary Conference. The educational institute for the district was well attended and such interest was shown in the study classes that we feel the institute will prove of great value to our auxiliary work. As a result of our study of India the District gave \$94.00 to Bishop Azariah for work in his diocese.

The truest sign of our growth is the fact that an increased number of branches report Bible Classes which they have sponsored, and several branches have formed prayer groups with the specific purpose of praying for world peace. It is hoped that these groups will be the nucleus of a larger number and that they will grow in the vision of their power as instruments of God's purpose in the world.

The district feels that greater cooperation between diocesan and district officers would be the means of more effective work by the branches.

### DISTRICT OF GRANVILLE

"Be still and know that I am God." "There is no great work without serenity." This has been our theme for the past year. We asked each member of the auxiliary to give ten minutes a day for quiet and meditation for we felt that in order for peace to be in our world — peace must be in each heart first.

Meetings were held with the executive board and plans for our spring were discussed and we decided upon a different type

of meeting, one which would give district secretaries an opportunity to know the branch secretaries.

The spring meeting was held in Warrenton and our guest speakers were Bishop Penick and Mrs. W. S. Holmes. The district of Granville had sponsored this year a washing machine for Miss Bessie Blacknall. Various branches in the diocese contributed to this fund and it was announced that the machine had been purchased and was giving valuable help to "Miss Bessie."

Being held in the homes in small groups lent interest and gave a sense of fellowship which was most stimulating and helpful.

All, whether officer or not, went into these groups planned to develop and train leaders.

The keynote of the meeting was the certainty that THERE IS a way out of today's discords and confusion that seem to paralyze people's wills to redirect their lives God-ward. The guest speakers were Mrs. W. S. Holmes, Mrs. H. B. Taylor, wife of a medical missionary to China, and Mr. C. A. Cole, of Oxford. Noon day prayers by Rev. Defoe B. W. Wagner, of Warrenton, who led in penitential prayers for Europe and America.

Our United Thank Offering Custodian was elected — Mrs. R. H. Lewis, of Oxford.

Mrs. Tucker, the retiring United Thank Offering Custodian, handed in a splendid report for her three years:

In the autumn meeting Bishop Edwin A. Penick spoke on the "Silver Lining," under which he pointed out eight major events occurring in the Diocesan work.

May the work of the Auxiliary go forward optimistically, as revealed in the words of our Bishop, "living our own life."

### REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF COMMITTEE ON YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK, JANUARY 1940

In 1939 six districts sent in reports of Young People's Work as compared with four in 1938. Three of the four districts which failed to send reports last year sent in excellent ones this year, which leaves only one district that sent a report neither year.

From a careful study of these reports several challenging facts stand out:

1st. Auxiliary women are evincing more interest in Young People's work. The following quotations from reports bear this out: "The members of the Woman's Auxiliary in both the Christ Church and Good Shepherd parishes are showing increased interest in young people."

From Forsyth-Rowan: "We see that the Auxiliaries are giving much thought and interest to the work of our young people, and what is more inspiring?"

2nd. Secretaries of Young People and Counsellors believe in summer camps and conferences. Quotations proving this, "They all enjoyed their experiences very much and brought back enthusiasm and new ideas with them. The parishes can already see results in many ways." "Sent two leaguers to conference and

one to the teachers training school and she is now giving her service to the church school."

3rd. There are not enough church schools on the Honor Roll. To be on the Honor Roll a church school must have had a program on and have contributed to the five offerings.

Little Helpers Offering, thirty-two schools participated.

The Christmas Box, fifty-four schools participated.

The Diocesan Offering, thirty-nine schools participated.

The Birthday Thank Offering, forty-five schools participated.

Lenten Offering, nearly all schools participated. Ninety-seven schools participated.

Here are the figures:

Edgecombe—1 school on the Honor Roll.

Forsyth-Rowan—4 schools on the Honor Roll.

Granville—3 on Honor Roll.

Guilford—2 on Honor Roll.

Mecklenburg—6 schools on Honor Roll.

Orange—2 on Honor Roll.

Richmond—1 school on Honor Roll.

Wake—All schools on Honor Roll.

Negro District—No report.

Out of a hundred schools, only 25 are on the Honor Roll.

The District of Wake should have a banner; theirs is a very real and worthwhile achievement.

4th. The Young People's Work needs the services of a Director of Christian Education. (a) The Church School by mail has had to be abandoned. (b) Very few parishes have had training schools for teachers. (c) Expert advice as to curriculum is badly needed by the Church Schools. (d) The Young People's Service League has repeatedly requested a full time worker.

This work with young people has been one of the greatest blessings of my life. Whether it's been my contacts with the children in my own parish, through the Church School and Service League; in the Diocese, at Camp Penick, Jr., or serving with them on the Board of Christian Education; or in the nation and world, through my interest in all youth gatherings, all contacts have been a joy.

Now I am fully convinced that Winifred Kirkland was right when she said, "Young people can teach us more than we can teach them."

### REPORT OF PRAYER PARTNER CORRESPONDENT

At our last meeting I reported the resignation of Deaconess Sime from her mission work in Idaho. Since the Missions House did not have enough missionaries on their list to assign us another Prayer Partner in her place, we decided to adopt one of the Missionary Wives from our own diocese. So the District of Mecklenburg now has as Prayer Partner, Susan Smith Chapman, of Anvik, Alaska.

Again this year I have to report the resignation of, not one, but two of our Prayer Partners from the mission field—Miss Helen Disbrow from Kyoto, Japan, Prayer Partner for the District of Edgecombe, and Miss Mildred C. Edmunds from the

Community House at Jave, Virginia, Prayer Partner for the District of Wake.

The shortage of missionaries must be very acute, for again they write from the Missions House that they have no new missionaries to assign us. I have suggested to the Districts of Edgecombe and Wake that they, too, adopt missionary wives from our own diocese as Prayer Partners. This would meet with the approval of the director of the Prayer Partnership Plan, who writes: "I think your idea of adopting the wife of one of your foreign missionaries is a splendid one. We do not assign the wives of missionaries, and are only too glad when the dioceses take a special interest in them."

### REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN WORK AMONG THE ISOLATED

In lieu of a formal report of the Committee on the work among the Isolated I, the Chairman, would like to recommend, and append hereto a resolution, that the Committee for Work Among the Isolated be abolished. After a considerable amount of work, thought and worry, I have come to the conclusion that there is no proper place for this committee in the Woman's Auxiliary. As you know there are two phases to this work: Making contact (1) with those who are isolated by reason of sickness, poverty or infirmity, and (2) with those who are isolated by reason of distance. The first phase of this work properly belongs in the sphere of Christian Social Relations and the second calls for skilled training in the field of Christian Education and should be assigned to a trained worker, perhaps, in this Diocese to the Director of Christian Education. The Committee appointed at the last Convention to study organization, and numerous individuals with whom I have discussed this matter concur in the opinion.

Whereas, we believe the above arguments sufficient, be it resolved that the Committee on Work Among the Isolated be abolished and its fields of activity reassigned to relevant committees.

### REPORT OF REPRESENTATIVE ON LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

The State Legislative Council composed of representatives of eleven organizations interested in Social Welfare legislation met prior to the opening of the 1939 general assembly and discussed measures of interest to the various organizations represented.

From this discussion a Legislative Program was drawn up. This program included eight measures which the Council would support and five recommendations.

While nothing was done in regard to a number of the measures and recommendations of the Council, there were a few bills passed which were of paramount importance in the opinion of the Council.

First in order being a bill introduced by Senator Long, of Halifax, "to require physical examinations prior to issuance of a marriage license."

Two other bills of far-reaching importance introduced by Senator Long and to which the Council gave its approval and what assistance it could were passed. First, "to require immunization of children against diphtheria" and "to require Wasserman test during pregnancy." The passing of these measures is certainly a great step forward in Public Health.

Important advances were made also in the fields of the Welfare Department and Safety and Election Reform.

However, much more needs to be done and the Council will have important measures to support in 1941.

One pressing need is licensed boarding homes for neglected and dependent and delinquent children.

In 1938 approximately 1,000 children under sixteen years of age were held in North Carolina county jails because of inadequate facilities in boarding home care. These youthful offenders should not be associated with hardened criminals, but a Christian State should provide a chance for a better life.

No provision has been made for a more efficient enforcement of law requiring compulsory attendance of children at school. Again, should not a Christian State bring opportunity to those little ones whose parents do not care?

Adolescent delinquent negro girls at large are a menace to communities. Yet there is no place to put them where they can

be segregated and through teaching perhaps be made useful members of society. An industrial and training school for negro girls is one of the greatest needs in the State.

At present there is no state institution for feeble-minded negro children. Some of these, especially border line cases, are also a menace to communities.

More adequate facilities for mental patients are needed. About 100 each month of these sick people are lodged in jails because there is no room for them in the State Hospital.

It has been a real pleasure to represent the Auxiliary on the Legislative Council and I want to thank the Social Service Chairmen who helped when called upon during the session of the legislature.

I feel that the work done at home was much more effective than that done in Raleigh. These men whom we have elected want to carry out our wishes. We should think over these matters and let them know that we are interested in our fellow man.

## CONSTITUTION

---

### ARTICLE I

#### Name

The name of this organization shall be, "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

### ARTICLE II

#### Object

The object of this organization shall be to help in carrying out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church: Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service.

### ARTICLE III

#### Membership

The membership of this organization shall be composed of all Parish and Mission Branches within the Diocese.

### ARTICLE IV

#### Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: A President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of Christian Education, a Secretary of Christian Social Relations, a Secretary of Supply, a Custodian of United Thank Offering.

Section 2. These officers with the District Chairman shall constitute the Executive Board, and shall meet at least twice a year at the call of the President.

### ARTICLE V

#### Duties of Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for. She shall also preside at meetings, and at every Annual Meeting shall address the Auxiliary. She shall make a report to the Diocesan Convention.

Section 2. The Vice-President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have specific duties to be decided in conference with the President.

Section 3. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist the President in preparing and having printed the Annual Report, and at each Annual Meeting shall make a report.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering and Box Work money, and shall make a report of same at the Annual Meeting. At the end of every fiscal year, the Treasurer's accounts shall be veri-

fied by a public auditor. The Treasurer's report, as audited, shall be published in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Section 5. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Education shall promote and stimulate educational work in the branches of the Diocese by every means in her power, and carry out the program of the National Department of Religious Education.

Section 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Relations shall co-operate with the Christian Social Relations Departments of the Diocese and of the National Council, in the promotion of their plans and programs.

Section 7. The Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in the Spring and Fall of each year, and shall remit immediately for investment to the Treasurer of the National Council.

Section 8. The Secretary of Supply shall have charge of the work of the Supply Department.

## **ARTICLE VI**

### **Term of Office**

Section 1. All Diocesan officers shall be elected for a term of three years; the President to be elected at the first Annual Meeting after the Triennial, and to take office at the close of the second Annual Meeting after the Triennial; the United Thank Offering Custodian to be elected at the first Annual Meeting after the Triennial; the Secretary of Supply and the Secretary of Christian Social Relations to be elected after the second Annual Meeting at the Triennial; a Vice-President, a Treasurer, and a Secretary of Christian Education to be elected at the third Annual Meeting after the Triennial.

Section 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President for one year.

## **ARTICLE VII**

### **Districts**

Section 1. For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into districts.

Section 2. A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman duly elected by her District for a term of three years. In case of vacancy the Vice-Chairman shall serve as Chairman.

Section 3. Each District shall hold at least one and, if possible, two meetings a year.

## **ARTICLE VIII**

### **Election of Diocesan Officers**

Section 1. Prior to the Annual Meeting, the President shall appoint from the Executive Board a nominating committee of three who shall consider proposed nominees to fill the elective offices at the Meeting, and from the names suggested or considered the Committee shall recommend to the Meeting the nominees for such offices. The consent of the nominees shall be obtained by the Committee before making the recommendation.

Nominations may be made from the floor of the Meeting by any delegate provided the consent of the nominees has been first obtained. A majority vote shall be required for all elections. In case there are more than two nominees for the same office and no candidate receives a majority vote, the name receiving the smallest number of votes shall be dropped from the ballot.

Section 2. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund for the Calendar Year preceding the meeting.

## **ARTICLE IX**

### **Finance**

The Executive Committee in consultation with the Bishop shall prepare a budget for the year. This budget shall be presented to the branches for their support at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Section 2. From the total amount pledged towards the budget, one-half shall apply to the work of the National Council, one-half to the work of the Diocese.

Section 3. The United Thank Offering and contributions for the Supply Department shall be in addition to the payments on the budget.

## **ARTICLE X**

### **Amendments**

This Constitution may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present, provided a written copy of the proposed amendments has been filed with the Diocesan Secretary, and a notice of same mailed to each branch by the Secretary at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting.

---

## **BY-LAWS**

The place and time of the Annual Meeting shall be approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

1. The order of Business for the Annual Meeting shall be arranged by the President and the Executive Committee.

2. Each Parish Branch having fifty members or less shall be represented by the Branch President and one other delegate (appointed by the President or elected by the Branch). The President, or her representative, and the delegates each has a vote. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the Branch to an additional delegate with power to vote.

3. Each Branch shall be assessed twenty-five cents per member to provide for Provincial Expenses, printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of Speakers, and other items necessary for the proper administration of this organization. This shall be known as the Central Fund.

4. One-fourth of the Branches having the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at the Annual Meeting. Five members shall constitute a quorum at the Executive Committee Meetings.

5. The Diocesan President shall appoint at the beginning of her second year of office the following Chairmen, to serve for

three years: Chairman of Church Periodical Club; Inter-racial Chairman; Legislative Chairman; Missionary Correspondent; Chairman of Young People's Work.

6. The District Officers shall correspond to the Diocesan Officers and shall be elected at the first meeting of the District after the Diocesan Annual Meeting.

The District Chairman shall appoint the following Chairmen, to serve for three years: (1) Church Periodical Club; (2) Prayer Partnership Correspondent; (3) Young People's Work.

7. Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be the authority in all questions of Parliamentary law not covered by these By-Laws.

8. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates at any Annual Meeting.

### A MESSAGE FROM OUR BISHOP

This year's key-note of the Auxiliary, "Witnessing Through Service," is a timely call to action. Christian living even under favorable circumstances has always been hazardous. The true witness has never enjoyed much "ease in Zion." In these perilous days, when Christianity is being successfully attacked in many quarters, the loyal, consistent Christian life calls for courage of a high order. May they be enabled by the sufficient power of Him "who spake as never man spake" and who also "went about doing good."

#### THE GOLDEN ALMS BASIN

In June, 1852, Bishops Delancey of Western New York and McCoskry of Michigan, accompanied by the Rev. Dr. Wainwright of New York, Secretary of the House of Bishops, went to England at the invitation of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, to represent the Church in America on the occasion of the third jubilee of the venerable society. They had a most enthusiastic reception and were the guests of honor at gatherings all over the land. On the afternoon of June 21st they found themselves at Oxford, where, in the gardens of Exeter College, a large number of "Bishops, Noblemen, Clergymen, Masters, Tutors, Fellows, Graduates and Undergraduates" were assembled to meet them. The newspapers of the day gave an imposing list of the nobility present, among them were Dr. Pusey, and Chief Justice Coleridge.

The Regius Professor of Divinity, prefacing his address of welcome with the words, "It was the ancient custom of this great university that guests shall bear with them from its walls some little memorial of the joy with which their visit had been welcomed," asked them to take back with them this alms-basin as a gift from "various members of the University of Oxford" to the Church in America, "which", said Dr. Jacobson, "we venerate and love, as so nearly related to our own church."

The Bishops were so taken by surprise that they were almost unable to make fitting response and acknowledgment of the gift. Bishop McCoskry, who was received with loud manifestations of applause, said, "I cannot find words to express my feelings on this occasion—for this unexpected and beautiful testimonial of affection—not to us, but to the Church we represent, and as its humble ministers we receive it. But there has been a still stronger gift received by us, for a deep impression has

been made upon our hearts, an impression which no time can efface."

It was a noble gift indeed. The Alms Basin is about twenty-two inches in diameter. The border is silver gilt, beautifully chased. The center panel, of solid gold, shows the offering of the Magi. On the face is the inscription:

Eccelesiae Americanae  
Dilectae in Christo  
Oxonienses  
1852

On the reverse are the words, "This dish, weighing 80 oz., 12 dwt., was made to receive a chased medallion of unknown assay."

Since this Alms Basin has been in our possession, it has been used to receive all the United Thank Offerings of the Woman's Auxiliary, from the first of a little over two thousand dollars made in the Church of the Holy Communion, New York, in 1889, to that splendid gift of nearly five hundred thousand dollars laid on the altar of St. Paul's Cathedral, Detroit, last October, a total of considerably over two million dollars. The United Thank Offering has been gathered by the work and prayers of women all over the world, of many races and kindred and tongues, and has made possible the consecration of many lives to the Master's service.

A word about Christian Witnesses by our Bishop: "No better example of a Christian witness can be found than St. Paul. His superior qualification for testifying to the truth as it is in Jesus Christ is found in his second epistle to St. Timothy, where he wrote: "I know whom I have believed." His knowledge was not acquired through any intermediate agency. It was not derived at second hand from hearsay. It represented the personal, first hand experience of the Apostle whose commission to testify had come directly from Christ Himself. There was a freshness and immediacy and vitality about his evidence because he knew whereof he spoke.

"Inquirers and doubters today are searching our Christian witness to discover or discern a reality there upon which they may build their trembling convictions or rest their hopes. They do not want objective knowledge about God or about the Christian revelation. They can learn that for themselves unassisted. But what they do want supremely is to detect in us a sense of the reality of the personal knowledge of the holy things of which we speak. Then they will listen, and gladly, because they recognize our witness to be true."

### STATE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL ADOPTS LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM

#### General Assembly 1941

- I. Measures the Council will support and work for:
  1. Raising the compulsory school attendance age from 14 to 16 years, with adequate facilities for enforcing the law.
  2. A comprehensive state minimum wage and maximum hour law in substantial conformity with the Federal law.
  3. A state supported nine months school term.
  4. Protection of young men called to military service by prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors in training camps and territory adjacent thereto.
  5. State aid for extending public library service.
  6. Provision for an industrial training school for Negro girls.
  7. Promotion of highway safety through the reissuance of drivers' licenses every three years.
- II. The Council Endorses the following measures:
  1. The Retirement and Tenure plan for teachers and state employees. Sponsored by the State Department of Education.
  2. Extension of organized county health service to include the 100 counties in the state. Sponsored by the State Board of Health.
  3. Provision for more adequate care and treatment of the children of both races who are mentally ill and defective. Sponsored by the State Department of Public Welfare.

### REPORT OF MISSIONARY CORRESPONDENT

As Missionary Correspondent, this year has been an interesting one. Letters from the missionaries have been full of encouraging news. The Jadi Martins have returned to the state and are located now in Wadesboro, N. C. The Drapers are in Louisiana with Bishop Jackson. Mary Wood McKenzie, of Liberia, is now at home on furlough. It is reported that Annie Cheshire Tucker is on her way home from China; also news reaches us that Dr. Dissosway, of Shanghai, is to land in the United States soon. Each district in the diocese except Edgecombe has its own prayer partner. Edgecombe has adopted Laura Clark for an indefinite time. There is a shortage of missionaries, and again they write from the Missions House that they have no new missionaries to assign us. The Mission field is calling. We have one young girl to add to our list—Miss Jettie Odell, of St. Luke's, Spray, N. C., who is working in eastern Carolina. Her address is Calabash Route, Shallotte, N. C. Throughout the year I have been in contact either by mail or personal visits with all district prayer partner chairmen in an effort to encourage the work. Letters have been mailed to our foreign missionaries as well as the domestic missionaries listed on page seven in the Year Book.

"Send us out, if Thou wilt and through us send out many another to work for the extension of Thy Kingdom throughout the world".

### REPORT OF SECRETARY OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS FOR 1940

There is reason for encouragement in our reports this year. To begin with, there were seventy-four branches reporting instead of sixty-four and a total of \$4,890.15 spent for the work, an increase of more than \$500.00. Also there is a decidedly increased interest in and support of the Thompson Orphanage. And there seems to be continued feeling of our responsibility toward local social agencies and co-operation with them.

On the other hand, rapidly changing world conditions are constantly presenting issues which we as Christians must face. The spread of totalitarianism reaches forth greedy hands to seize not only the wealth but the lives of men and women. And almost daily the area of armed conflict spreads in all parts of the world but ours. In its wake comes suffering—physical and spiritual—whose depths we do not know.

With the coming of so many refugees to our country we are reminded of that little refugee family two thousand years ago. How often have we thought with envy of those whose privilege it was to make that journey lighter, to take that anxious family into the protection of their country and into the loving friendship of their homes. We wonder who found work for the carpenter Joseph, who made a place in the community for the little family, who nursed the baby Jesus that his tired mother might rest. To-day that same privilege is ours.

As a part of our Christian Social Relations work we can share our material wealth and our spiritual wealth with those who have come to our own shores, we can share our money through Relief Funds with those across the waters on either side, we can share our time in sewing and knitting and the making of Red Cross supplies.

And then as Christian citizens of a world community, we can face our responsibility for the conditions today—penitently, for our lack of a true sense of that citizenship yesterday, but resolutely, that hereafter we may always be intelligent, Christian citizens bearing our part not only in the making of our own country but of the whole world.

We have a special contribution for today—to a world of doubt we offer a certain faith, for we “know whom we have believed”; to a world in despair we offer the hope given us by One who said “Be of good cheer, I have overcome the world”; to a world of hate we offer the power of love, knowing that there will always abide faith, hope, and love, but that of these three the greatest is love.

#### **STATEMENT ABOUT THOMPSON ORPHANAGE**

**Superintendent, M. D. Whisnant**

In 1937 Thompson Orphanage celebrated its fiftieth anniversary. \* \* \* The Rev. W. H. Wheeler served as superintendent until June 12th, 1940. At this date Mr. Whisnant became superintendent and Mrs. Whisnant supervising matron. The case worker, Miss Helen D'Anna, has been added to our staff. This has been done so that we will be assured that the most needy of our group will be the ones that we care for. This is in accordance with the advancement that has been made in social service work.

We have organized a work program in which every boy and girl has a definite job to do every day. This is their contribution to the Orphanage. There is also being established an allowance fund which pays them something in return for the work they do. This is new and funds are needed to help with this work. In the training of children it is very important that they learn the value of money and how to use it. The method of clothing the children has also been changed. When clothing is received it is placed in the store room. This clothing is issued to any child who needs clothing; then when the money has been sent in from the various auxiliaries new clothing is bought to take care of all the clothing needs of the children. The children are carried to the store when the clothing is bought.

The Superintendent wishes to express to the auxiliary his appreciation for the many kindnesses shown them and for the generous gifts sent to the Orphanage.

#### **REPORT OF DIRECTOR CHRISTIAN EDUCATION**

In the words of one of the great leaders of our Episcopal Church, “The Christian life is a life of faith in God, of love and trust toward Him. It is a life of worship and service to God.

Christian education must be a means of helping people in such a life."

With this as an objective, just what is the work of the Director of Christian Education? Certainly no brief clear-cut list of duties could define it. The concern of Christian Education is to help persons, whether young or old, to live as Christians—to face actual concrete situations and to resolve the issues involved in terms of Christian values. It is concerned with making every phase of life Christian.

No church can hope to do its work with professional leadership alone. No matter how clearly the professional leaders may see the task, the realization of their vision is conditioned by the quality and quantity of lay workers available. This is especially true in young people's work. The motivating and enlisting and educating of lay people constitutes one of the most crucial problems in the whole work of the church. The emphasis of our work in Christian Education therefore needs to be on leadership training for teachers, counselors and key young people. There is a reservoir of spiritual power for the church in the young people of this diocese right now, but it needs to be harnessed by unification of effort and strong, well-trained, intelligent and sympathetic leaders.

With this end in view, the visits I have made to twenty-three parishes in the past four months have been spent on training classes of from three to six hours each in the meaning and techniques of leadership and program building, on methods and use of their materials. There have been eleven such groups, seventeen informal talks, sixty-seven individual conferences, and talks to nineteen Y. P. S. L. groups.

Effort is now being spent on having small groups of leaders and potential leaders gather at common centers for short training courses where actual experience will be given in working out programs and study courses. Two such week-end conferences will be held in the late spring, one in Raleigh and one in Salisbury. Our camp at Vade Mecum offers great advantages as a conference ground of leadership training.

The curriculum of the School of Teacher Training at Vade Mecum in June is being planned to offer to every teacher helps in how to teach the course to be used in his or her class in the coming year. However, it will take the enthusiasm and united effort of the parish, clergy and leaders, to assist in gathering the group of teachers and in financing their attendance at these conferences.

The Parish Education program suggested by our National Department of Christian Education and the United Movement of the Church's Youth give us a definite goal with practical means of reaching it. This, I believe, is the greatest need of Christian Education in this diocese.

I would like to express here my appreciation of the complete cooperation of clergy, laity and young people in the arduous but thrilling task of moving Forward in Service.

**REPORT OF THEODOSIA HALL, CHARLOTTE,  
NEGRO SOCIAL SERVICE WORKER**

Coming to the close of four short months of service in the field of Christian Social Relations at St. Michael and All Angels' Church, I doubt if an adequate report is possible. But knowing that the Woman's Auxiliary is vitally interested in this new project of the Diocese of North Carolina, we are setting forth herewith some of the things attempted and some of our aspirations for the future of the work.

We have centered our activities around the church in the immediate community. A survey has been taken of the community with the object of finding the unchurched adults, unbaptized children and the possibilities of assisting needy and distressed families and thus be able to add unattached persons to the church and building up in the life of the people respect for law and order, the making of good citizens and filling both adults and children with a knowledge of Christian living.

Our community is composed chiefly of migrants from other states and other communions. These people lack the type of training which our church gives and consequently their ideals are somewhat different. They know and understand very little of our Church and one of our objectives has been to break down the prejudice and opposition to the Church or rather to build up a consciousness of the Christian Religion and its teachings through the Church. We have attempted to foster this work through the establishment of clubs among adults and children.

We have a Mothers Community Betterment Club which we feel is doing much along the line of awakening in the minds of the mothers thus contacted a consciousness of Christian Living. We have stressed the ideas of better health for our community, a raising of the morale of our homes and our community and a clearer vision of personal religion for them and for their children.

The health program has been greatly enhanced by the co-operation given by the Superintendent and Supervisors of the Good Samaritan Hospital. A series of instructing talks were given over a period of one month to the Mothers Community Club. These talks covered Personal Hygiene, the Care of the Sick in the home and the care of young children in diseases common to childhood. We feel that these instructive talks have done much good as evidenced to the Worker in later contacts in the home and discussions among the club members alone.

The rector of St. Michael's has from time to time given instructive talks on our part in raising the moral tone of the community and has attempted to make them accept the church as a center around which a better community may be built up. Several boys have been rescued from the Delinquent Home and brought into the Sunday School; we are praying that these may be so reclaimed that we may offer them as candidates for Confirmation.

We are having some measure of success with the children of the community. Some have been added to our Church School. A large number come under our influence in our clubs for boys

and our clubs for girls. We have through games, story telling and songs tried to teach them the ideals of fair play and christian brotherhood.

With the beginning of Lent we will have weekly services for the children and the Rector hopes by these to give added instruction to the work of the Church School and the Week Day Clubs.

We have an ideal location here for a work of the kind we are attempting: the healing of souls and bodies. The Church on one corner with priest, worker and people acting as a beacon light to sin sick souls and on the opposite corner our hospital ministering to the sick and wounded bodies, not only of our own community, but the city of Charlotte and surrounding towns.

There is a great future in the work if we have faith and courage to pursue it. The results may not always be tangible, but we feel that through prayer and perseverance we may be able to make the influence of our great church be of inestimable value and power in a sin-sick world.

#### **THE WORK OF OUR DIOCESAN MISSIONARY AS DONE IN ROCKINGHAM COUNTY AND VICINITY**

The week begins for our Diocesan missionary, Lillie Hill, in Rockingham County, on Sunday at St. Mary's-by-the Highway at 9:30 a. m., where there is a live Sunday school. From there, our missionary goes to the mother mission, St. Andrew's, where at 11 a. m. church school begins. All the officers for 1941 in this church school were elected from the intermediates with one exception. After the election, they all knelt around the altar for the installation, this indeed being a beautiful sight. The little rectory of St. Andrew's is being renovated by them for a community recreation house, which will fill a real need.

After dinner on Sunday, emergency calls are made and at four o'clock, Miss Hill, with her faithful helpers, goes to the prison camp where she now has a real Sunday school room, with table, bookshelves, benches, etc. A very definite interest is taken by the prisoners.

The work at St. David's, a remote place in Rockingham County, was brought about through a little girl, who was interested in her uncle being converted before he died. This has resulted in many baptisms and confirmations. One of the most recent services held in this section was on January 4th, 1941, when a man, who had been hostile to the work, sent for our missionary to baptise him. Arrangements were not only made for his baptism but for his wife's twin sister and several children in each home to be "sprinkled". As Bishop Jett was having a mission in Spray at the time, the missionary requested that he go along too for the service of confirmation. As there were several already prepared for the "laying on of hands," there were eight baptisms and six confirmations in this little shack. It reminded one of the early Christians who went everywhere preaching the Gospel.

Through the interest of a released converted prisoner, another work has been opened to the missionary within the last year at

Pole Ridge, Va., a mountain section near Stuart. Many blessings of souls for hire have been realized.

On Thursday afternoons, Miss Hill visits the county jail where three services are held, one for both the white and colored women, one for white men and another for colored men. From there each week the county home is visited where a service is held and bedside prayers said for the bedridden. Personal work is done among the thirty-day prisoners confined there. Magazines are distributed. Many receive Christ for the first time and are baptised. Most of them are now members of the Episcopal church. So many could truly say before coming there, "No man careth for my soul."

Miss Hill, through the co-operation of a throat specialist, sees that children with defective tonsils have them removed.

Many a prisoner's mother is contacted and often times united through her. In October, before going to Kansas City, she had the privilege of putting a young man, who was in jail, on a bus to go to his broken hearted mother in Chester, Pa.

January 27th, she had the privilege of entering two girls in Pfeiffer Junior College in Misenheimer, N. C., where scholarships were obtained for them. Through mission boxes she was able also to help provide necessary clothes.

Forgotten men at the penitentiary are remembered at Christmas with cards. Forgotten shut-ins are remembered and at Christmas sunshine boxes are carried to them, well filled with confectionaries, fruits and little gifts. Five weeks before Christmas strenuous preparations begin for the usual intensive Christmas program. Through the wonderful generous co-operation of her own diocese, Miss Hill was able to carry out an enlarged program in 1940. This last year there were trees at the prison camp, jail, county home, St. Andrew's, St. Mary's-by-the Highway, Pole Ridge, Va., and St. David's. There were also boxes of toys, clothing and confectionaries for poor families. Groups were trained for Christmas programs at St. Andrew's and St. Mary's-by-the Highway. The pageant, which was presented at St. Mary's, by request, was given at Epiphany Church, Leaksville, St. Luke's, Spray, and St. Andrew's.

Last but not least is the work of the Woman's Auxiliary. Being widely scattered the meetings are not as frequent as some but the work goes on and there is hardly any phase of Miss Hill's work that the W. A. does not help in some way.

## CHURCH WORK AMONG THE DEAF IN THE DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA

In 1905 definite and organized church work was begun for our deaf people in the Diocese of North Carolina. It was started by late Rev. Sidney S. Bost.

On May 20, 1906, Bishop Cheshire confirmed, in St. Phillips' Church, Durham, a class of seventeen persons, ten of whom were men and seven women. Mrs. Fortune and I were in the class. So

far as we know, this was the first organized class of deaf people ever confirmed in the Diocese.

There are two churches for the use of the deaf people in our Diocese. They are Ephphatha Church, Durham, and St. Athanasius Church, Burlington. In other Dioceses in the United States, the deaf have access to one church only. The Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese pledged and paid \$3,000 toward the building fund of Ephphatha Church.

I wish to take this opportunity on behalf of deaf-mutes everywhere to thank the members of the Woman's Auxiliary who have shown their interest and extended their help in this our work.

I have eight preaching stations, travel 3,000 miles and conduct 183 services a year with the help of some lay assistants. Deaf population of the territory estimated at 1,000. Attendance averages eight to 100 per service.

### ST. MARY'S HOUSE

St. Mary's House, Greensboro, has functioned as a center for Episcopal students' activities for thirteen years. As a parish church, it offers monthly communion services and weekly vespers. As a home away from home, it is the center for eating, napping, and friendly arguments. The program takes on an informality from the nature of the house itself, as committees become friendly chats over a cup of tea and meetings become gay picnics over a simple supper. Around an open fire, students discuss deep and fundamental truths and problems, sometimes culminating in a service project for an underprivileged group in the community.

The annual Episcopal Student Conference and other collegiate enterprises make St. Mary's House the spiritual center for student activities in the Diocese. A program of cooperation with groups of many types serves to broaden and deepen the students' concept of religion and appreciation of the particular gifts of their church.

### ST. AUGUSTINE'S COLLEGE

St. Augustine's College, in Raleigh, offers to Negro men and women an accredited four-year course leading to the degree of Bachelor of Arts or of Science. Graduates are scattered over North Carolina and throughout the United States, occupying positions of honor and responsibility in professional and vocational pursuits. A large proportion of the Negro priests of the Church have had their general education in this institution.

St. Agnes' Hospital Training School for Nurses is an accredited Grade "A" school whose pupils on graduation are eligible to take the State Board Examination in order to become registered nurses. The school was opened when the first patient entered the hospital in 1896. There were two graduates in 1898. The hospital serves Wake County, the City of Raleigh, cares for crippled

children from one-third of North Carolina, and co-operates with the State Commission for the Blind.

The Bishop Tuttle School was established by the Woman's Auxiliary in 1925 to train young Negro women for work in the church. The two-year course, open to college graduates, follows the general requirements of training in social work and religious education, because the purpose is to train workers who will understand the needs of the soul and of the body, helping the whole man. This training can be developed in either field as the graduate follows her preference or ability, as well as her opportunity. The local field work is with the Junior Woman's Auxiliary of St. Augustine's College; the neighborhood Sunday school, that meets in our building; in St. Agnes' Hospital, where a Tuttle graduate is head of a social work department; in the Tuttle Community Centre, where there is expert leadership in clubs and classes; in the family service, city-county public welfare, recreation commission and other activities of the well organized Community Chest of Raleigh. During the summer the juniors take positions in social agencies. The seniors are off for three months in a social agency or parish.

#### BRIEF OUTLINE OF VADE MECUM'S HISTORY

In the gay 90's Vade Mecum was a thriving summer resort, famous for its mineral spring. Hundreds of people from all parts of the country came there to drink the magic healing waters. The property was first owned by Mr. Sparks, of circus fame, who headed a corporation ownership. He sold it to another incorporated group headed by J. Cicero Tise, who became sole owner.

When the resort closed, some thirty years ago, Mr. Tise left the property at his death, with a \$100,000,000 endowment, in the hands of the Winston-Salem Foundation, the name for the twelve men who are the trustees of the property.

In 1930-31 the Diocese of North Carolina put in application for use of Vade Mecum as its Camp and Conference Center. The property had lain idle all these years, tended only by an old caretaker. When the church took over the property on a conditional three-year lease, there was an old hotel building, several dilapidated old cottages and farm buildings. The Foundation prepared the property for camp use, by renovating the old building and reservoir, and constructing a 100x40 swimming pool.

The first sessions the church held were camps—a two-weeks camp for senior boys, and one for senior girls. In addition there were two ten-day periods for junior boys and junior girls. The camp was managed by Rev. J. A. Vache, of Greensboro, from 1931 to the beginning of the 1936 session. During his manager-ship the Tise Hall gymnasium was built, and many improvements were made to the property, and additions were made to equipment each year. In 1936, during Mr. Vache's illness, Rev. A. S. Lawrence, Jr., became manager and Vade Mecum continued to grow in its influence in the life of the Diocese. During the past few

years a new barn, two new tenant houses, an addition to caretaker's house, garage, incinerator and ten new cabins have been erected, in addition to many repairs and improvements to existing property. With the exception of the cabins these changes have been financed entirely by the Foundation.

At the present date, 1941, Vade Mecum is a modern up to date camp and conference center. Its total capacity at any one time is 120. Camps are limited to 80, plus staff. There are twelve camps and conferences on the three months summer schedule each year.

Vade Mecum has become the summer training ground for the people of the Diocese, and is now an integral part of its annual program. The 866 acres of land, with lights, water, modern plumbing facilities in its 17 buildings, athletic field, and athletic courts, swimming pool, farm, and proposed lake, belongs to the Diocese, and is ours to develop and use for all the years to come.

### SOME OF OUR MISSION STATIONS

One of the oldest and most remote of all Alaskan missions is Christ Church, Anvik. The Rev. Henry H. Chapman, whose father died in 1939, and was for forty years in charge of the same mission, is priest in charge, school master, engineer, adviser, and universal friend not only to the mission community but to surrounding settlements in the wilderness.

Mr. Chapman is also medical officer, for since the reduced staff has included no nurse, he has done what he could to relieve suffering. Even pulling teeth has not daunted him—nor his willing patients.

### SOUTH DAKOTA, ST. MARY'S

The only accredited high school for Indian girls in the United States is St. Mary's, the Episcopal Church school at Springfield, S. D., which was started as a little elementary school in 1871 and has gradually attained its present position by careful adaptation to the real needs of the field. There are between 35 and 40 girls.

I wish sometime that some of you could come and visit St. Mary's. I am sure that you would realize, as a letter like this cannot make you, the fact that you are making a real investment in life and that that investment is bringing mighty fine returns.

I will be grateful to you if you will tell these things to the Woman's Auxiliary as you have opportunity and that you will tell them of our very deep gratitude to them for this continued act of kindness on their part.

The House of Bethany was started in 1904 by Miss Agnes Mahoney, and Miss Margueretta Ridgely. Miss Mahoney had been connected with the St. John's School until that time. When she

came over on the east side of the mountain she started dispensary work and Miss Ridgely took up school work. Miss Mahoney's health gave way soon after that and she returned to America. Miss Ridgely remained on the field for twenty-eight years—retiring in 1932. Three times she saw the school outgrow its buildings. Each time the friends in America responded with funds for new and better ones. At present the buildings are quite adequate for the needs of the school—are comfortable—airy and sanitary.

Miss Mary Wood McKenzie, head of the House of Bethany, Cape Mount, Liberia, coming from Salisbury, N. C., is probably quite as well known and loved in that Diocese as she is at Church Missions House. She is now senior in years of service of the whole foreign staff in Liberia and a distinguished member of the Episcopal Church's whole world-wide staff.

"A report was made in regard to the Huntington Endowment Fund for the Assistant Bishop showing that there is already in hand US\$847.33 and CC\$4,015.47 with a definite promise of an additional US\$1,000.00 from the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina. Plans were made to enlist the aid of the whole diocese and other friends in support of this important project."—*Anking News Letter*.

"The Good Samaritan Hospital, which was organized by St. Peter's Church as the first hospital in the United States for the exclusive care of Negroes, by the action of its board has become the Negro Unit of the Memorial Hospital. A new out-patient department and other improvements are being made to the existing building so that its field of service can also be extended.

One floor of the new Memorial Hospital has been named St. Peter's Floor, and on its walls the memorial tablets from the old building have been placed. In addition all of the rooms of this floor were contributed by Episcopalians as memorials or honorariums. Thus the spirit and tradition of St. Peter's will always live in the new medical center.

Of interest to Episcopalians is the lovely chapel located on the main floor of the hospital. A bronze tablet on the wall of the chapel is inscribed:

"This Chapel is Erected to the Glory of God and for the Comfort of Those who Come Here for Meditation and Prayer by the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Peter's Episcopal Church and by St. Peter's Hospital, in Grateful Memory of the Founders, Friends, Benefactors and Administrators of St. Peter's Hospital from Its Founding in 1877 to 1940'."—*Living Church*, 1940.

### ST. MARY'S SCHOOL—HISTORY AND DESCRIPTION

Saint Mary's School was founded May 12th, 1842, by the Rev. Aldert Smedes, D.D. It was established as a church school for girls and was for thirty-six years the chosen work of the founder, of whose life work Bishop Atkinson said: "It is my deliberate judgment that Dr. Smedes accomplished more for the advancement of this Diocese (North Carolina), and for the promotion of

the best interests of society in its limits, than any other man who ever lived in it."

The present location was first set apart as the site for an Episcopal school in 1832, when influential churchmen, carrying out a plan proposed by Bishop Ives, purchased the present "Grove" as a part of a tract of 160 acres, to be used in establishing a Church school for boys. First the East Rock House, then West Rock House and the Main Building now called Smedes' Hall, after the founder, were built for use in this boys' school. But the school, though it started out with great promise, proved unsuccessful and was closed; and the property passed back into private hands.

Dr. Aldert Smedes, a New Yorker by birth and education, had given up parish work on account of a weak throat, and was conducting a successful girls' school in New York City when in 1842 Bishop Ives met him and laid before him the opportunity in his North Carolina diocese. The milder climate attracted Dr. Smedes; he determined on the effort; came to Raleigh with a corps of teachers; gave Saint Mary's her name, and threw open her doors in May, 1842.

From the first the school was a success, and for the remainder of his life Dr. Smedes allowed nothing to interrupt the work he had undertaken. During the years of the War between the States, Saint Mary's was at the same time school and refuge for those driven from their homes. It is a tradition of which her daughters are proud, that during those years of struggle her doors were ever open, and that at one time the family of the beloved President of the Confederacy was sheltered within her walls.

On April 25, 1877, Dr. Smedes died, leaving Saint Mary's to the care of his son, Rev. Dr. Bennett Smedes, who had been during his father's lifetime a teacher in the school. This trust was regarded as sacred, and for twenty-two years, in which he spared neither pains nor expense, Dr. Bennett Smedes carried on his father's work for education.

During this eventful half-century, Saint Mary's was in the truest sense a Church school, but it was a private enterprise. The work and the responsibility were dependent upon the energy of the Drs. Smedes. Permanence required that the school should have a corporate existence and be established on a surer foundation as a power for good, and in 1897 Dr. Bennett Smedes proposed to the Diocese of North Carolina that the Church should take charge of the school.

The offer was accepted; the Church assumed responsibility, appointed Trustees, purchased the school equipment from Dr. Smedes and the real property from Mr. Cameron; and in the fall of 1897 a charter was granted by the General Assembly.

By this act of the Assembly, and its later amendments, the present corporation—The Trustees of Saint Mary's School—consisting of the Bishops of the Church in the Carolinas, and clerical and lay trustees from each diocese or district, was created.

The Board of Trustees, by the terms of the charter, is empowered "to receive and hold lands of any value which may be granted, sold, devised or otherwise conveyed to said corporation, and shall also be capable in law to take, receive and possess all

moneys, goods and chattels of any value and to any amount which may be given, sold or bequeathed to or for said corporation."

The Church was without funds for the purchase of the school property, and the Trustees undertook a heavy debt in buying it, but the existence of this debt only slightly retarded the improvements which were made from year to year in the school buildings and equipment, and in May, 1906, this purchase debt was lifted and the School became the unencumbered property of the Church in the Carolinas.

Under this ownership there have been great improvements in new equipment and new buildings, made possible largely by the legacy of Miss Eleanor Clement, a former teacher, and by donations for those purposes.

Dr. Bennett Smedes, who had long wished for the disposition of Saint Mary's that was actually effected, continued as Rector after the Church assumed charge, until his death on February 22, 1899. He was succeeded by the Rev. Theodore Du Bose Bratton, Rector of the Church of the Advent, Spartanburg, S. C., who administered the affairs of the School very successfully until he entered upon his duties as Bishop of Mississippi in the autumn of 1903, when Rev. McNeely Du Bose, Rector of Trinity Church, Asheville, N. C., became Rector. Under his devoted and loving care the School continued its usefulness for four years until his resignation in 1907, when Rev. George W. Lay, of St. Paul's School, Concord, N. H., took charge. His aggressive and active management for eleven years added greatly to the success of the School. In 1918 Dr. Lay was succeeded by the Rev. Warren W. Way, formerly Rector of St. Luke's Church, Salisbury, North Carolina. During Dr. Way's administration, the school had a most successful period of growth. Dr. Way resigned in 1932 to resume parish work, and the present President, Mrs. Ernest Cruikshank, an alumna of the school, graduate of Columbia University, and former teacher at Saint Mary's, assumed the management of the school at the beginning of the school year 1932-'33.

## CONSTITUTION

### ARTICLE I

#### Name

The name of this organization shall be, "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

### ARTICLE II

#### Object

The object of this organization shall be to help in carrying out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church: Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service.

### ARTICLE III

#### Membership

The membership of this organization shall be composed of all Parish and Mission Branches within the Diocese.

### ARTICLE IV

#### Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: A President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of Christian Education, a Secretary of Christian Social Relations, a Secretary of Supply, a Custodian of United Thank Offering.

Section 2. These officers with the District Chairman shall constitute the Executive Board and shall meet at least twice a year at the call of the President.

### ARTICLE V

#### Duties of Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for. She shall also preside at meetings, and at every Annual Meeting shall address the Auxiliary. She shall make a report to the Diocesan Convention.

Section 2. The Vice-President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have specific duties to be decided in conference with the President.

Section 3. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist the President in preparing and having printed the Annual Report, and at each Annual Meeting shall make a report.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering and Box Work money, and shall make a report of same to the Annual Meeting. At the end of every fiscal year, the Treasurer's accounts shall be verified by a public auditor. The Treasurer's report, as audited, shall be published in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Section 5. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Education shall promote and stimulate educational work in the branches of the Diocese by every means in her power, and carry out the program of the National Department of Religious Education.

Section 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Relations shall co-operate with the Christian Social Relations Departments of the Diocese and the National Council, in the promotion of their plans and programs.

Section 7. The Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in the Spring and Fall of each year, and shall remit immediately for investment to the Treasurer of the National Council.

Section 8. The Secretary of Supply shall have charge of the work of the Supply Department.

## **ARTICLE VI**

### **Term of Office**

Section 1. All Diocesan officers shall be elected for a term of three years, the President to be elected at the first Annual Meeting after the Triennial, and to take office at the close of the second Annual Meeting after the Triennial; the United Thank Offering Custodian to be elected at the first Annual Meeting after the Triennial; the Secretary of Supply and the Secretary of Christian Social Relations to be elected after the second Annual Meeting at the Triennial; a Vice-President, a Treasurer, and a Secretary of Christian Education to be elected at the third Annual Meeting after the Triennial.

Section 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President for one year.

## **ARTICLE VII**

### **Districts**

Section 1. For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into districts.

Section 2. A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman duly elected by her District for a term of three years. In case of vacancy the Vice-Chairman shall serve as Chairman.

Section 3. Each District shall hold at least one and, if possible, two meetings a year.

## **ARTICLE VIII**

### **Election of Diocesan Officers**

Section 1. Prior to the Annual Meeting, the President shall appoint from the Executive Board a nominating committee of three who shall consider proposed nominees to fill the elective offices at the Meeting, and from the names suggested or considered the Committee shall recommend to the Meeting the nominees for such offices. The consent of the nominees shall be obtained by the Committee before making the recommendation. Nominations may be made from the floor of the Meeting by any

delegate provided the consent of the nominees has been first obtained. A majority vote shall be required for all elections. In case there are more than two nominees for the same office and no candidate receives a majority vote, the name receiving the smallest number of votes shall be dropped from the ballot.

Section 2. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund for the Calendar Year preceding the meeting.

## **ARTICLE IX**

### **Finance**

The Executive Committee in consultation with the Bishop shall prepare a budget for the year. The budget shall be presented to the branches for their support at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Section 2. From the total amount pledged towards the budget, one-half shall apply to the work of the National Council, one-half to the work of the Diocese.

Section 3. The United Thank Offering and contributions for the Supply Department shall be in addition to the payments on the budget.

## **ARTICLE X**

### **Amendments**

This Constitution may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present, provided a written copy of the proposed amendments has been filed with the Diocesan Secretary, and a notice of same mailed to each branch by the Secretary at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting.

## BY-LAWS

The place and time of the Annual Meeting shall be approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

1. The order of Business for the Annual Meeting shall be arranged by the President and the Executive Committee.

2. Each Parish Branch having fifty members or less shall be represented by the Branch President and one other delegate (appointed by the President or elected by the Branch). The President, or her representative, and the delegates each has a vote. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the Branch to an additional delegate with power to vote.

3. Each Branch shall be assessed twenty-five cents per member to provide for Provincial Expenses, printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of Speakers, and other items necessary for the proper administration of this organization. This shall be known as the Central Fund.

4. One-fourth of the Branches having the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at the Annual Meeting. Five members shall constitute a quorum at the Executive Committee Meetings.

5. The Diocesan President shall appoint at the beginning of her second year of office the following Chairmen, to serve for three years: Chairman of Church Periodical Club; Inter-racial Chairman; Legislative Chairman; Missionary Correspondent; Chairman of Young People's Work.

6. The District Officers shall correspond to the Diocesan Officers and shall be elected at the first meeting of the District after the Diocesan Annual Meeting.

The District Chairman shall appoint the following Chairmen, to serve for three years: (1) Church Periodical Club; (2) Prayer Partnership Correspondent; (3) Young People's Work.

7. Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be the authority in all questions of Parliamentary law not covered by these By-Laws.

8. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates at any Annual Meeting.

# MINUTES

The Fifty-Ninth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Diocese of North Carolina convened Tuesday morning, April 29, in St. Martin's Church, Charlotte. Opening prayers were read by the rector, Rev. C. A. Cole.

The meeting was called to order by the President, Mrs. W. S. Holmes. Mrs. W. L. Mauney of the hostess branch extended the welcome. Response was made by Mrs. J. W. Huddle, Chapel Hill. The Vice President, Mrs. H. B. Hutchison, then took the chair while the President gave her message, saying:

"More than a year has elapsed since we gathered together in annual meeting. There have been months fraught with anxiety and with misgivings on the part of those who see events only as they pertain to this world. But our Leader has told us that His Kingdom is not of this world and He has assured us that He has overcome the world. It behooves us, then, as His followers, to look up and behold fields white unto the harvest; and to take His yoke upon us and learn of Him who is meek and lowly and still victorious. 'Not by might nor by power but by my spirit saith the Lord.' As we scan the record of our doings since 1940 let us not rejoice too greatly in the fact of our growth and numbers nor of our increased financial budget. For both of these we are justly grateful. There is no need for me to go into detail. The record is in your hands, and you have proof of increased activities. We trust that you approve of the few changes that we have made in our setup. We have tried to simplify our machinery and the running seems very smooth.

"It is with a great deal of pleasure that we note in the Handbook five new branches, and two have been organized since. We welcome them. Within the past year we have been made happy by the appointment of a director of Christian Education and we have secured a capable Negro Social Worker. After a long period of anxious waiting and of earnest prayer we are made glad by the announcement that a nurse has arrived in Anvik, Alaska. We have more objectives in our Diocesan Budget than ever before and there is more interest in them because we know more about them year by year.

"Friends, we have been bold in our keynote for the year; let us accept it as a real challenge to the sincerity of our purpose. Let our light so shine before men that they may see our good works and glorify, not us, but our Father in Heaven.

"We cannot be content until our organization represents and includes the whole womanhood of the Church, united in fellowship through worship, study, service and gifts. We cannot force spirituality upon people by compelling them to more service. We can only create in them a desire for more consecrated service because they love more. I call you to witness through service that your loyalty is to Him whose service is perfect freedom."

The President then read the following committees:

Elections—Mrs. Harry G. Winkler, St. Peter's, Charlotte; Mrs. H. C. Bourne, Tarboro; Mrs. Ogburn Yates, Asheboro.

Findings, Resolutions and Courtesy—Mrs. C. H. Cheatham, Oxford; Mrs. W. B. Little, Wadesboro; Mrs. T. P. Thomas, Wilson; Mrs. T. C. Powell, Jr., Raleigh; Mrs. R. G. Shannonhouse,

Pittsboro; Mrs. John Gilmer, Winston-Salem; Mrs. C. V. Palmer, Holy Comforter, Charlotte.

Mrs. Fred Ramsey, Provincial President, was then presented. She brought a brief message and urged strongly the use of the pamphlet "Forward Day By Day" in co-operation with the Presiding Bishop, in his "Forward in Service" plan.

The following missionaries were then presented: Mrs. Ethel Byerly Simmonds, wife of the Rev. Harvey Simmonds in Liberia; Miss Lula Boyd, Japan; Mrs. Annie Cheshire Tucker, China; Miss Mary Wood McKenzie, Liberia; Rev. J. L. Martin, returned from Hawaii.

Reports from Diocesan officers were then made and accepted. The Treasurer reported a balance to date April, 1941, of \$3,256.93 and stated that the suggestion of the Finance Committee was that the amount of the Budget for 1942 remains the same as this year. Miss Grimes moved that this be accepted. It was seconded and carried. Miss Grimes then moved that the \$1,000 which had been pledged toward the support of a nurse in Anvik, Alaska, and which had now been appropriated by National Council be used toward the salary of the Rev. Harvey Simmonds of Liberia. Motion seconded and carried.

Noon day prayer, meditation and address by Miss Margaret Marston, National Executive Secretary, took place at this time.

Reports of the Diocesan officers were then completed.

Report of the retiring United Thank Offering Custodian is attached.

Adjourned for lunch.

At 2:15 p. m. the meeting was resumed with the singing of hymn 493.

Report of the Credential Committee gave 128 delegates present, making 65 a majority necessary for election. The prayer for use at time of election of officers was made, and articles of Constitution and By-Laws concerning elections were read.

The Nominating Committee reported as follows: For President, Mrs. Urban T. Holmes, Jr., Chapel Hill; United Thank Offering Custodian, Mrs. R. H. Lewis, Oxford; Nominee for Membership on Executive Council, Mrs. J. A. Mackie, Winston-Salem.

The President then called for nominations from the floor. There being none she declared the nominations closed. Chairman of the Elections Committee moved that the secretary be instructed to cast the ballot.

Miss Easdale Shaw moved that the elections be made unanimous. This was seconded and carried.

Reports of the District Chairmen were called for and all responded except chairmen of Wake and Negro districts.

Miss Mary Wood McKenzie was the missionary speaker of the afternoon and told of some of her work at Cape Mount School in Liberia.

The result of the elections for delegates for the Provincial Synod to be held in Charleston, S. C., November 16, was as follows: Mrs. W. S. Holmes, Mrs. U. T. Holmes, Jr., Mrs. E. A. Penick, Miss Corinna Gant, Mrs. W. J. Gordon. Alternates: Miss Sallie Grimes, Mrs. Julien Robertson, Mrs. Charles M. Swart, Mrs. W. L. Mauney.

Mrs. Annie Cheshire Tucker then made a short address on the work in China stating that she had seen a great change in the womanhood of China since she had entered the country in 1909.

Roll call of the branches was at this time called for and showed an attendance of 220.

Miss Emma J. Hall, Inter-Racial Chairman, presented Miss Theodosia Hall, Negro Social Worker in Charlotte, who gave a brief account of her work, asking the sympathy and prayers of the Auxiliary.

Mr. Bourne, of Tarboro, extended for the branches of Calvary Church an invitation for the next annual meeting. This was accepted with appreciation.

The meeting then adjourned and there followed a tour of the Orphanage and tea at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Whisnant, Superintendent and Matron of Thompson Orphanage.

The meeting was resumed at 8:15 when the Rt. Rev. John L. Jackson, of Louisiana, was the preacher of the evening. He took as his text, St. Luke, 24th chapter, 47th and 48th verses. His words were a challenge to the members of the church as to their responsibility for living up to their baptismal vows.

### WEDNESDAY, APRIL 30

Celebration of the Holy Communion at 7:30 with Bishop Penick, celebrant, assisted by the rector, Mr. Cole. Commemoration of the departed was read by the Bishop. The United Thank Offering Prayer was reverently sung by a member of St. Martin's Choir. The amount of the offering at this service was \$35.32.

The morning session was opened with prayers by the Rev. Willis G. Clark, of St. Peter's, Charlotte.

Miss Sarah Vann, Alumnae Secretary for St. Mary's College, gave a brief outline of some phases of activities of the school, speaking particularly of the coming celebration of the Centennial.

Mr. M. D. Whisnant, Superintendent of Thompson Orphanage, gave an enlightening picture of the present working plan of the Orphanage in the rearing of its children.

Miss Margaret Fletcher, Student Worker at Woman's College, U. N. C., made a report on the work of the students there.

Rev. A. S. Lawrence, Jr., director of Vade Mecum, told of plans for the coming camps and conferences at Vade Mecum, its tenth anniversary.

Mrs. Leavett, Provincial Chairman of Department of Promotion, and Vice President of the Girls Friendly Society, spoke briefly of the work of her department and then introduced Miss Emily Wilson, Field Representative of the Girls Friendly Society, who has been loaned for promotional work with the United Youth Movement of the Church.

Miss Jennie Trapier was the next speaker. She made a strong and challenging appeal to the members of the Auxiliary for greater zeal and responsibility toward Christian Education of their families.

The report of Committee on Findings, Resolutions and Courtesy was then made and it is attached to these minutes.

Mrs. Francis Clarkson moved that the members of this Convention endorse the election of parish officers in the spring to take office in September. This was seconded and carried.

The minutes of the meeting were then read and approved.

The Bishop then gave his charge to the Auxiliary, after which the newly elected custodian was installed by him and the benediction pronounced. The President announced the meeting adjourned.

I want to take this opportunity to thank you for the privilege of participating in that great Eucharistic service, also for the privilege of being the Custodian of your United Thank Offering for the past three years. Only those of you who have held this office can know the joyous contacts it brings and what an inspiring thing it is to be reminded twice a year by the pouring in of the Offering of the sacrificial living and sincere faith of the womanhood of the Episcopal Church in this Diocese.

Owing to the change in dates of our Annual Meeting it has devolved upon me to carry on as Custodian beyond the allotted three years. Imagine, then, my joy to be able to announce to you the largest single Offering since I have been Custodian: \$3,796.32, and not quite all Parishes have been heard from.

I hope this is a sign that more of our women are contributing to the United Thank Offering, and I hope that whatever hard and difficult days are before us we shall keep ever closer to Our Master, thanking Him upon every remembrance, and by our gifts of thanksgiving making it possible for His Church to go forward undaunted.

## REPORT OF FINDINGS AND COURTESY COMMITTEE

The Fifty-ninth Annual Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary has been marked particularly by the unusual number of distinguished visitors and the inspiring presence of so many missionaries in our midst. Mrs. Fred Ramsey, Provincial President; Mrs. Leavitt, Provincial Chairman of Promotion, urged our cooperation in Forward in Service objectives. The spirit of optimism in those lately returned from active missionary service abroad gives to the Auxiliary a deeper sense of responsibility to hold fast to what gains have been made for the kingdom and to meet the challenge of these trying days with a determination of purpose and a strength given us by the constant renewal of our vows. Annie Cheshire Tucker's message of the development of Chinese womanhood and of her confidence in the ability of Chinese Christians to go forward in service during this emergency was heard with great thankfulness that the work in China has been so blessed. Our president not only urges us forward, but goes forward at all times in personal service to the parishes she so beautifully serves. The women of the Auxiliary appreciate the closeness of her relationship to them, her inspirational leadership and untiring efforts.

The unusual attendance at this convention has been a source of real thanksgiving and a complete satisfaction in changing the time of meeting to the spring.

We are grateful for the Bishop's presence and are anticipating his charge to us.

Miss Emma Hall introduced Theodosia Hall, negro Social Service worker, who gave us an inspirational talk. We are deeply interested in all phases of her work. She asked for the cooperation of both races with a deeper spiritual attitude of love and unity.

The committee was deeply interested in hearing Miss Emily Wilson, field worker of the Girls' Friendly Society and of the Youth Movement of the Church, and urges that the plan of the Youth Movement to direct the youth into the life of the Church in co-ordinating what we have receive full support from the Auxiliary.

Miss Trapier has come to us with enthusiasm and a hearty endorsement of Miss Wilson's suggestions for the spread of Christian Education.

Bishop Jackson's remark that this has been his 27th convention with the women of the Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina is typical of his relationship to the Auxiliary. His presence with us and his message to us has been a real joy to us all.

The members of this committee in behalf of all present wish to express our sincere appreciation for the privilege of attending this interesting and inspiring convention. For the gracious hospitality extended us by the rector and entire membership of St. Martin's; for the use of their beautiful church, we are most grateful. We cannot close without emphasizing particularly the excellent work of the pages, the choir, transportation committees, luncheon committees, and the detail planning for such a successful convention. The use of the loud speaker has been of inestimable benefit in such a large meeting. St. Martin's has truly given us the genuine meaning of welcome and hospitality.

The shepherds found the infant Christ, wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger. And they returned from Bethlehem, "glorifying and praising God." On the Mount of Ascension, Christ commissions his disciples to proclaim him to all nations. He raises his hand in final benediction; a cloud receives him out of their sight. Then the disciples returned to Jerusalem, and continued with one accord in prayer. Thus the Gospel ends as it began, wrapped in a mantle of devotion.

And now the Church stands in the place of those first disciples. The commission that they received to evangelize the nations has been handed on to us. The difficulties with which this assignment is bristling provide a stimulant to eager discipleship. May it never be said of us, in one of the darkest hours in human history that we served too little and came too late.

We pray that God will permit His Church to look upon the world's confusion with level gaze, to see the rise of opportunity for the Church's ministry to all nations as changing conditions make them malleable and subject to the shaping influence of a new Christian order. It is important to keep our heads.

It is more important to keep our hearts. For what would it profit America to win the war and lose its own soul? May the God of all pity keep us so true in our worship of Him, that, as we look out upon the nations that are scattered abroad as sheep having no shepherd, we may bear faithful witness to the Gospel of the Son of Compassion.

**FANNIE YARBOROUGH BICKETT****An Appreciation**

Mrs. Thomas W. Bickett served the Woman's Auxiliary as its president during the period 1921-1924. Those of us who knew her and her beloved husband in their home life in the Governor's Mansion and later in the privacy of their own home in Raleigh sensed in them in marked degree a spirit of simplicity and unworldliness that endeared them to their personal friends and brought them close to the public whom they served.

The earliest picture of Mrs. Bickett that comes to my mind is that of the little girl, Fannie Yarborough, sitting in the lap of her old negro "mammy", who was a mother to the motherless child, drinking in the stories dramatically told her by this beloved nurse. She used to say that this experience implanted in her soul a love of fairy tales, of Uncle Remus, of the brave Confederate soldiers and Confederate women, of the Bible. Long years afterward we might say that this scene was re-enacted when her own little grandchildren would relate these same stories of fancy, of heroism, of spiritual power that had enriched her own life.

It was during these tender years that the love of the negro race also was born in her and led her to work for justice and mercy towards them. Saint Agnes Hospital, with its loving ministrations to the suffering negroes whom she was instrumental in sending there, weighed constantly on her heart, and she longed passionately to see this worthy church institution recognized and supported by the church people of Raleigh.

In looking through Mrs. Bickett's annual reports as president of the Auxiliary one is inspired afresh by the spiritual vision and the rare humility of soul that they reveal. She was ever urging us on to greater achievement while at the same time she pointed out wherein we had fallen short. It was during her administration that the Auxiliary became a member of the Women's Legislative Council of North Carolina. I recall her loyalty to Bishop Cheshire when she refused to allow a controversial matter of this nature to be brought up on the floor of the convention without first consulting him. The Bishop gave his consent, and under the stimulus of forceful addresses setting forth the need for reforms in the social structure of the state—reforms which could be brought about only by legislation—the Auxiliary recognized its corporate responsibility to work for such legislation and voted to affiliate with the Legislative Council. The value of this forward step was increasingly borne in upon Mrs. Bickett throughout the long years when she served her county as Commissioner of Welfare. She bore the griefs and carried the sorrows of multitudes of her underprivileged sisters and brothers, and it is no wonder that her loving heart was weakened by the strain thus put upon it. She finally succumbed to that growing weakness, and on July 3, 1941, while still in harness, she entered into the fullness of joy.

To do justly, to love mercy, to walk humbly, to fashion a life not conformed to this world but transformed by living close to her Lord and Savior—these ideals faithfully cherished present to us in Fannie Bickett the portrait of a true Christian. May God help us to carry on in our own lives her spirit of loving ministry to the least of the Master's brethren!

## ANNUAL MEETING 1942

### *Keynote: "Witnessing Through Worship"*

The Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, Diocese of North Carolina, met for its Annual Meeting, in Calvary Church, Tarboro, April 15, 10:45 a.m.

The Rev. Geo. Henry gave the call to worship.

The President announced that the session was in order, and greetings were extended by Mrs. Pembroke Nash, of the hostess branch, who said that this meeting marked the sixtieth anniversary of the first Diocesan Auxiliary meeting which was held in Tarboro, on this same spot.

Mrs. Harvey Cox from Mayodan responded to the greetings.

The President asked that all stand in silent tribute to the past presidents who had died during the year. Rev. Mr. Henry read the prayer for departed saints.

The President presented Miss Emma Hall, who made a report on her attendance at the National Executive Board Meeting, in New York. Her picture of the intensive work of this Board gave the members a more sympathetic insight into it.

The following committees were then announced by the President:

Nominations: Mrs. Francis O. Clarkson, Mrs. E. M. McEachern, Mrs. R. T. B. Little.

Elections: Mrs. R. B. Davis, Mrs. Woodrow McKay, Mrs. F. B. Drane.

Credentials: Miss Dolores Pitt, Mrs. Paul Taylor.

Findings: Mrs. H. H. Hutchinson, Mrs. W. L. Mauney, Miss Lillie Hill, Mrs. Roger Gant, Mrs. Thomas Longhurst, Mrs. E. F. Lucas, Mrs. F. G. Jarman.

Reports were then made by the Diocesan Officers as follows: Chairman of Christian Education, Mrs. E. G. Peoples; Chairman of Christian Social Relations, Mrs. F. O. Clarkson; Chairman of Supply, Miss Corinna Gant; United Thank Offering Custodian, Mrs. R. H. Lewis.

In the absence of the Treasurer, Miss Sallie Grimes, the report on the budget was postponed.

Noon day prayers were led by Rev. Gray Temple.

An address, "Forward in Service," was made by Rev. Craig-hill Brown.

Following this the President made her address.

The roll call was asked for and a resolution passed that the calling of the roll be dispensed with for this meeting, and the report of the Credentials Committee be substituted.

Miss Pitt, Chairman, read her report as follows: Number of delegates, 123; number eligible to vote, 123; number visitors, 97; total 220.

At this time invitations for the next meeting were extended by St. Paul's, Winston-Salem, through Mrs. Paul Taylor, and from Good Shepherd, Raleigh, through Mrs. Elmer E. Beach. By a vote it was decided to leave the decision to the new board.

The meeting then adjourned for lunch in the parish house, served by the Presbyterian women.

Meeting resumed at 2:15 p.m. with singing of hymn 447.

Miss Gant read a letter from Mrs. Frank Spruill, sending loving greetings to the Auxiliary. Miss Gant also told of the illness of Mrs. H. G. Cooper, Oxford, and suggested that telegrams be

sent to these two past presidents. The President gave instructions that this be done.

Report from the Nominating Committee: Chairman of Supply Department, Mrs. W. R. Kuker, St. Philips, Durham; Chairman of Christian Relations Department, Mrs. V. K. Hart, St. Peters, Charlotte.

The President called for nominations from the floor and there being none it was voted that the secretary be instructed to cast the ballot for the election of these offices: This being done, the Chairman of Elections declared Mrs. Kuker and Mrs. Hart elected.

Delegates to the Provincial Synod were elected by ballot, as follows:

Mrs. E. G. Peoples, Oxford; Mrs. H. C. Bourne, Tarboro; Mrs. W. S. Holmes, Greensboro; Mrs. F. O. Clarkson, Charlotte. Alternates: Miss Emma Hall, Charlotte; Miss Corinna Gant, Burlington; Mrs. F. B. Drane, Monroe; Mrs. H. M. London, Raleigh.

Motion was made and carried that the President be empowered to appoint other alternates.

Rev. L. Harding Hughes spoke briefly in behalf of the North Carolina Churchman and asked that members send in news of interest to the church.

Rev. A. S. Lawrence, Jr., told of the building of a parish house at Walnut Cove, suggesting assistance in the completion of the building.

The District Chairmen were then presented, and reports handed in as follows:

Edgecombe, Miss Mary Philips; Granville, Mrs. James B. King; Guilford Mrs. E. E. Easley; Mecklenburg, Mrs. E. M. McEachern; Orange, Mrs. Harold Bird; Richmond, Mrs. R. T. B. Little; Wake, Mrs. I. M. Bailey.

The inspirational address of the afternoon was made by Mrs. John G. Magee, who had served as a missionary in China. She was presented by an associate of hers when she served there, the Rev. Craighill Brown. Her subject, "Christianity at Work in China," left all with a feeling of awe.

The Bishop pronounced the benediction.

#### EVENING SERVICE, APRIL 15, 8:15 P. M.

The preacher for the evening was our own Diocesan Bishop Penick, who based his sermon on the keynote of the meeting.

Wednesday morning, 7:30, Holy Communion, with Bishop Penick celebrant, assisted by the rector, Rev. Geo. Henry. The United Thank Offering was presented and the Commemoration was read of those members who had passed into the larger life during the past year.

The regular business session was opened at 9:30 a.m. with prayers conducted by the rector, Rev. Geo. Henry.

The President presented Miss Lillie Hill, missionary in Rockingham County, who told some incidents in her work.

Reports on Diocesan Objectives then followed, and were made by Mrs. M. D. Whisnant, Supervising Matron of Thompson Orphanage; Mrs. Ernest Cruikshank, President of St. Mary's Junior College; Miss Margaret Fletcher, Student Worker, St. Mary's House, Woman's College, U. N. C.; Miss Jennie G. Trapier, Field Worker in the Department of Christian Education; Mr. Stratton Lawrence, Jr., Business Manager of Vade Mecum; Mr.

Lawrence gave schedules of the summer camps and conferences. Mr. C. A. Cole supplemented the report of Mr. Lawrence, making an appeal for scholarships for Camp Tise.

Mrs. U. T. Holmes, Director of the Woman's Auxiliary Conference, Vade Mecum, gave a survey of the courses to be held there this summer.

The President then called for the reading of a motion which was passed at a call meeting of the Executive Board in regard to the Budget, viz.: That the goal of the 1943 Offerings remain the same as for 1942—\$3700 outside of the Diocese and \$3700 within—the amount to be budgeted by an enlarged finance committee before November 1st. The Bishop spoke a few words in explanation of this item, and a motion was then made by Miss Julia Robertson and seconded by Mrs. Elmer Beach, that the action of the Executive Board be sustained by the Auxiliary. This was carried.

Messages were brought at this time by our missionaries. Miss Bessie Blacknall, home on furlough from Alaska, spoke of the necessity of her early return. Dr. A. W. Tucker told of work in Shanghai, China, after the Japanese occupation.

Noon day prayers were led by Bishop Penick, followed by meditation by the Rev. W. Tate Young.

Reports from Special Committee Chairmen were made.

Report on Committee on Findings was read and will be printed in the Year Book.

The President called for suggestions as to how offering made at the evening service be used. A motion was made by Mrs. Knight that one-half be given St. Anges Hospital, Raleigh, for the purchase of needed articles. It was seconded and carried. Motion made and seconded that remaining half be used for scholarship for refugee children to attend the camps at Vade Mecum. Carried.

Minutes were then read and approved.

New officers were installed by the Bishop.

The retiring president gave the gavel to Mrs. Urban T. Holmes, newly installed President, who called upon the Bishop to pronounce the benediction and then declared the Sixtieth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of North Carolina adjourned.

### PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

"I thank my God upon every remembrance of you."

You are aware that this is our sixtieth annual meeting. This is also the seventieth year of the National Woman's Auxiliary. In this Diocese we are celebrating two centennials in 1942, that of St. Mary's School and of the parish of the Chapel of the Cross, Chapel Hill. Two decades ago, our Bishop was made co-adjutor of this Diocese. These are not statistics, they are reminders that the Lord's work has been going on for a long time in the name of the Protestant Episcopal Church of America. Are we entirely satisfied with its accomplishments? The Presiding Bishop says that we have squandered almost half of the present century and he begs us to redeem that time in the eight years that remain before we turn into the second half of the twentieth century A.D.

As I call these dates to your attention I am conscious that I

must say something of the past three years during which I have had the honor of being your president. They have been years full of privilege for me. Because of my office there have been contacts of inestimable benefit to me. Many of you I now call friends have come into my life through the shared interest of our love for the Auxiliary. The knowledge gained through my membership on the Executive Council and Diocesan departments will ever be an inspiration.

During my term of office I have attended 37 District meetings, have visited 28 parishes, have been present at 11 Executive Council meetings and many department meetings. Besides, I have been delegate at the Triennial Meeting and two Provincial Synods.

A great many letters have gone to you and I wish here and now to acknowledge my gratitude to Mrs. Swart for the excellent performance of her duties as secretary. Without the help and loyalty of the members of my executive board I could not have carried on the work these three years and three months. As I see my successor take over I can assure her a gracious support of all the officers and members of our Diocese.

I relinquish my office to her with full confidence in her ability and consecration, believing that she will lead us to a higher degree of fulfillment than we have ever attained.

The story of our three years work is recorded for future generations to consider in our Year Book. They will see that between 1941 and 1942 there were organized ten new branches, besides several evening groups which do not report as separate branches; our membership has increased by over 300; our budget was increased by \$600; many special gifts were made and the United Thank Offering grew by the amount of \$1,159.44.

Figures are not always evidence of spiritual growth, yet in these I do see increased interest and concern for our Father's business. We have not attained the membership that includes all of our women and we do not give enough time and serious thought on Christian Education. These I consider our greatest weaknesses and I wish to leave them with you as a final challenge.

World conditions have had such a dramatic change and effect on the work of the Church but we cannot alter the one great objective of Christians to make Christ known as Saviour and King. Thy Kingdom come is still our rallying cry and victory will be ours as we honestly strive to bring it to pass.

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINDINGS, COURTESY  
AND RESOLUTIONS**

The Sixtieth Annual Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary has been marked by the earnestness and consecration of the speakers. We feel that the keynote has been the appeal which every speaker has made to us not to neglect the work of the Woman's Auxiliary and of the church in the interest of war work.

Miss Emma Hall reminded us that "prayer is the first line of defense."

Mrs. Peoples urged us to take more interest in introducing Bible study in the public schools. She showed us a chart pointing out the fact that only one-half the people in this country have a Christian education.

Miss Gant, as retiring Supply Chairman, asked us not to allow our supply work to suffer in our increased interest in sewing for the Red Cross.

Our retiring President, Mrs. W. S. Holmes, gave us an inspiring message in which she pointed out there was not only an increase in membership in the Woman's Auxiliary, but an added interest and concern in our Father's business. He asked for more emphasis in the coming years on Religious Education and Social Relations.

Mr. Craighill Brown assured us that defense work did not need to be spectacular.

Mrs. Magee brought us a message of inspiration and courage. Her stories of the steadfastness and courage of the Chinese Christians under fire should strengthen our faith. She asked our prayers for the missionaries still in the field under fire and many in internment camps.

Bishop Penick emphasized our keynote, "Witnessing Through Worship." He said the essentials of worship are repentance, prayer, praise and study.

Miss Blacknall told us of her work for the past 25 years in Alaska at St. Mark's Mission, Nenana.

Dr. Tucker gave us a picture of the refugee work in China. He said it brought the people closer to the Christian movement.

The Rev. Mr. Tate Young in his meditation assured us that human strength is not enough for us. We must have God's strength to help us.

We are so grateful for the privilege of meeting in this historical town, this beautiful church, surrounded by the hallowed grounds where sleep so many whose deeds still live on; for the most gracious welcome extended to us by the women of Calvary Parish, through Mrs. Pembroke Nash, for the hospitable homes of the parish and community opened to us, for the thoughtfulness of the transportation committee, for the bountiful lunches that were so well prepared and served by the ladies of the Presbyterian Church, for the lovely tea, and the privilege of meeting our distinguished guests.

The distinctive charm of this convention will always be a happy memory.

### OUR TASK IN CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

By now no doubt you are all familiar with the Suggested Program of Christian Education for the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of North Carolina. You know that it is a program based on the idea of Witnessing through Worship. You know that we are trying to follow the Presiding Bishop's Forward in Service ten-year plan. You know that we believe in studying the Bible, and perhaps you are using the excellent outline of the Gospel of John prepared by Mrs. Gordon. You are familiar, I hope, with all of these things either through your parish chairman, or from following the program month by month as published in the North Carolina Churchman. There are some extra copies of the program which you will find, together with book lists of next year's study books, on the Christian Education table in the parish house. If you are interested in statistics you will find in the new handbook a report of this nature. Suffice it to say here that more people sent in reports, read books and attended summer conferences than in the preceding year.

Far more interesting things than this are happening today in the field of Christian Education, things that to know of is to wish to have a part in. Perhaps some of you have seen significant things happening in your parishes while they have been going through the process of putting themselves into action through the

Forward in Service program. Perhaps you've seen a Parish Council organized for the purpose of studying this great movement in our church, and you've seen the members realizing anew that God is our "source of power" and that truly we are nourished "not by bread alone".

If you were fortunate enough to be a member of the Diocesan Department of Christian Education you would realize that in our Diocese, too, interesting things are happening. Do you realize that this Department has a budget of more than \$5,000, that it has committees for church school work, young people's work, and college work? All of these committees are giving real thought to the task and opportunity of Christian education. In the diocese, too, we have a cooperative project at St. Luke's, Salisbury, where the National Council, the Diocese and the parish are working together to promote a real unified parish program that other parishes may have a pattern, and, in a way a practice school.

Note the time the recent meeting of the North Carolina Council of Churches gave to the subject of Christian Education, especially the placing of qualified Bible teachers in the public schools. We can rejoice that our Bishop is the president of this organization, and several of our leaders had places on the program. The Council sponsors several radio programs, one called The Churches Make News, another by the Federal Council called Religion in the News.

In our nation a significant movement is being launched this spring called a United Advance in Christian Education with its stated purpose: To reach every person with Christian teaching (Quote from leaflet). Our Forward in Service and other similar denominational efforts are a definite part of this United Advance (Quote from letter). An interesting outgrowth of the study of the Malvern Conference in this nation resulted in a conference in our own nation held recently in Delaware for the purpose of considering the bases of a just and durable peace. We pray that it is meaningful that in the midst of war so many people are studying this subject. Quoting from a statement to the church from the Presiding Bishop and the House of Bishops held recently in Jacksonville, Fla.: "The President has said that we must and will win not only the war but also the peace. Victory in the war is a prerequisite for winning the peace, but something more than a physical triumph is needed to make the ensuing peace an opportunity for producing a better world, one more in accord with God's purpose. To do this we must win the war as Christians. . . . We can win the war as Christians only by making America really Christian." It is to this high task we are called. We believe we can do it by "considering His will, sharing His spirit, and following His way." Let us then "put on the whole armour of God that we may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all *to Stand*" (Read Moffat's translation of next few verses) Ephesians 6:13-18.

**REPORT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS SECRETARY**

Already in the reports turned in from the branches last December there was evident a new and an increasing type of work being undertaken by the women of the church—that which has risen out of war and all that comes with it. We are facing the problems of camps and camp communities; of large defense areas which have grown up over night; of the transfer from one section of the country to another of numbers of men in the armed forces and of defense workers and their families; of the call for war relief work in our own country and others.

These and many similar problems came to us in almost overwhelming numbers. And at the same time we realize that those things in our society with which we have been working throughout the years have assumed even greater importance than ever before. Work with the youth of our country, the prevention of juvenile delinquency, the preservation of the Christian home and family life, the building of racial understanding and cooperation, the lifting up and restoring to their rightful place in society of those who have fallen—all become more urgent in a world which is changing so rapidly.

This is a tremendous challenge to our Social Relations Program—we must carry on our community and social service work; we must meet the special needs of today and we must be willing to share of our abundance with those throughout the world who have not. In order that this program may be realized, we must plan our work more carefully, it cannot be accomplished by haphazard methods. That it may be intelligent we must study not only the immediate problem, but those which we shall face in a post-war world: the readjustments, economic, social and political, which must be made nationally and internationally.

And finally, if it is to be truly effective, it can only be done with God's help and in His name. Many things confront us today which seem insurmountable. May we pray and work for a deeper faith and a clearer vision of God's purpose in this changing world and of our part in bringing it about.

**A RESOLUTION SUGGESTED BY THE STATE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL FOR ADOPTION BY THE MEMBER-ORGANIZATIONS OF THE COUNCIL AT THEIR VARIOUS STATE CONVENTIONS DURING 1942**

Whereas, the State Legislative Council, of which the Woman's Auxiliary of Diocese of North Carolina is a member, met on April 4, 1942, and considered problems concerning Education, Highway Safety, Public Welfare and Labor; and

Whereas, the Council recommended that the following tentative program be submitted to member-organizations for consideration and approval in their annual conventions:

*Education*

1. Raise the compulsory school attendance age from 14 to 16.
2. Place enforcement of the compulsory attendance law under the supervision of the Superintendent of Public Instruction and provide adequate funds for its enforcement.
3. A state-wide, state-supported nine months school term.

*Highway Safety*

1. A law requiring periodic re-issuance of driver's license.
2. Legal reduction in maximum speed limit.
3. A law requiring semi-annual examination of automobiles.
4. A law making mandatory suspension of automobile license for 30 days and a fine of \$25.00 for first offense of drunken, careless or reckless driving; 90 days suspension of license and \$100.00 fine upon second offense; and complete forfeit of license upon third offense.

*Public Welfare*

1. Provision for Industrial Training School for delinquent negro girls.
2. Provision for adequate care and treatment of the children of both races who are mentally ill and defective.
3. Amend present law requiring certain standards and management of jails, giving more authority to the Public Welfare Department and providing adequate funds for enforcement.

4. A law requiring that a program of work and rehabilitation be provided for women serving jail sentences.

5. State and Federal laws prohibiting sale of alcoholic beverages within camp areas.

#### *Labor*

1. A comprehensive state minimum wage and maximum hour law in substantial conformity with the Federal law, removing the exemption in the present law which permits employers of eight people or less to work women more than 48 hours and men more than 55 hours per week.

Therefore, Be it Resolved: That the tentative program recommended by the Council be adopted as a part of the Legislative Program of Woman's Auxiliary of Diocese of North Carolina for the year 1943.

### REPORT OF MISSIONARY CORRESPONDENT

The task of the Missionary Correspondent in the Diocese, the District, and the Parish, takes on added importance when we realize that the strain of war conditions is touching the lives of all of our missionaries and they feel more intensely than ever the need of our support if they are to continue their work as Christian soldiers in the field.

Since the first of the year every missionary listed in the Year Book as coming from our Diocese has been written to and in many instances they have replied enthusiastically. Personal news from these letters not found in church papers has been passed on to the district missionary correspondents, with the request that they send this news on to parish correspondents. This plan of keeping us all in contact with our missionaries is most practical and this department will continue to follow it in the future. It is assumed that the Districts will continue to keep in touch with their respective Prayer Partners.

We are all deeply concerned about our missionaries who have been interned by the Japanese since December, the Rev. Francis Cox, Miss Laura Clark and Mrs. George Laycock from our Diocese. Our letters to them are being returned, and our only recent news is a cable which implies that they are safe and in some instances carrying on their work, but stating positively that their money will be exhausted by the end of April. The National Council is now arranging to send them a small subsistence allowance through a plan worked out by the State Department with the Swiss Government.

Without exception letters from our missionaries bespeak our prayers and ask for us to be steadfast always in prayer for them and their work. We realize that for our interned missionaries the shield of our prayers is the only safeguard that we can give them. You will therefore want to use a prayer for them at your auxiliary meetings and in your private devotions. The following prayer, approved by the Presiding Bishop, is suggested:

"Sustain, O Lord, with Thy power all those in the mission field who by reason of war are now ambassadors in bonds; uphold them in the confidence that they also serve who stand and wait. Endue their souls with patience and sure trust in thy care and hasten the hour when they shall rejoice to be free; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."

### REPORT OF THE DISTRICT OF EDGEcombe

The programs arranged for these meetings have been quite full, and aside from routine of reports and business discussions, we have been most fortunate in having as our guest speakers Bishop Penick, Mrs. Theodore Partrick, Miss Van, Alumna Secretary of St. Mary's, Mrs. Annie Cheshire Tucker, and others. Our Presi-

dent, Mrs. Holmes, has been present at these meetings, bringing messages of interest and importance.

The programs have also included each time several ministers of our District, thereby giving them an opportunity to know better our District Auxiliary and the efforts and accomplishments in our work.

One executive meeting was held in 1941.

In the fall and spring Educational Institutes were held at Advent Church, Enfield, and were well presented and attended.

The reports of the secretaries of various branches at both spring and fall meetings have been very encouraging.

Supply Department reported value of boxes and money sent Thompson Orphanage \$718.55. The response to pledge for the Box Work pledges of money and making garments came from 13 out of 18 branches. Total amount of money pledged, \$110.25. Total amount of garments made, 32. Total amount of garments bought at wholesale prices by Miss Gant for us, 44; making up our quota of 76 garments.

The United Thank Offering Secretary reported spring of 1941 offering \$610.14, the largest ever taken.

The young peoples' work carries general good work reports especially in Halifax, Roanoke Rapids, Tarboro, Rocky Mount branches.

Christian Social Relations Secretary reports work done by 14 branches and that 8 branches have one program a year on Christian Social Relations. Work done in this branch of Auxiliary is quite varied, including working with local agencies, hospitals, county homes, schools, gifts and money to Thompson Orphanage, Chinese relief, interracial work, and many other types.

During the year St. Catharine's Branch of Auxiliary, Tarboro, planned a memorial to Rena Clark—this to be a drinking fountain placed on the grounds at the Thompson Orphanage and a plaque, and with their gifts of money and help from other branches of the Auxiliary this has been accomplished.

Another memorial to Rena Clark is to be placed at St. Mary's very soon by the Auxiliary.

The District of Edgecombe will hold its spring meeting at St. Luke's, Northampton County, May 19.

The object of this organization shall be to help in carrying out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church: Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service.

### ARTICLE III

#### Membership

The membership of this organization shall be composed of all Parish and Mission Branches within the Diocese.

### ARTICLE IV

#### Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: A President, a Vice President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of Christian Education, a Secretary of Christian Social Relations, a Secretary of Supply, a Custodian of United Thank Offering.

Section 2. These officers with the District Chairman shall constitute the Executive Board and shall meet at least twice a year at the call of the President.

### ARTICLE V

#### Duties of Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for. She shall also preside at meetings, and at every Annual Meeting shall address the Auxiliary. She shall make a report to the Diocesan Convention.

Section 2. The Vice President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have specific duties to be decided in conference with the President.

Section 3. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist the President in preparing and having printed the Annual Report, and at each Annual Meeting shall make a report.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering and Box Work money, and shall make a report of same to the Annual Meeting. At the end of every fiscal year, the Treasurer's accounts shall be verified by a public auditor. The Treasurer's report, as audited, shall be published in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Section 5. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Education shall promote and stimulate educational work in the branches of the Diocese by every means in her power, and carry out the program of the National Department of Religious Education.

Section 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Relations shall co-operate with the Christian Social Relations Departments of the Diocese and the National Council, in the promotion of their plans and programs.

Section 7. The Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in the Spring and Fall of each year, and shall remit immediately for investment to the Treasurer of the National Council.

Section 8. The Secretary of Supply shall have charge of the work of the Supply Department.

## **ARTICLE VI**

### **Term of Office**

Section 1. All Diocesan officers shall be elected for a term of three years, the President to be elected at the first Annual Meeting at the Triennial, and to take office at the close of the second Annual Meeting after the Triennial; the United Thank Offering Custodian to be elected at the first Annual Meeting after the Triennial; the Secretary of Supply and the Secretary of Christian Social Relations to be elected after the second Annual Meeting at the Triennial; a Vice President, a Treasurer, and a Secretary of Christian Education to be elected at the third Annual Meeting after the Triennial.

Section 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President for one year.

## **ARTICLE VII**

### **Districts**

Section 1. For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into districts.

Section 2. A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman duly elected by her District for a term of three years. In case of vacancy the Vice-Chairman shall serve as Chairman.

Section 3. Each District shall hold at least one and, if possible, two meetings a year.

## **ARTICLE VIII**

### **Election of Diocesan Officers**

Section 1. Prior to the Annual Meeting, the President shall appoint from the Executive Board a nominating committee of three who shall consider proposed nominees to fill the elective offices at the Meeting, and from the names suggested or considered the Committee shall recommend to the Meeting the nominees for such offices. The consent of the nominees shall be obtained by the Committee before making the recommendation. Nominations may be made from the floor of the Meeting by any delegate provided the consent of the nominees has been first obtained. A majority vote shall be required for all elections. In

case there are more than two nominees for the same office and no candidate receives a majority vote, the name receiving the smallest number of votes shall be dropped from the ballot.

Section 2. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund for the Calendar Year preceding the meeting.

## ARTICLE IX

### Finance

The Executive Committee in consultation with the Bishop shall prepare a budget for the year. The budget shall be presented to the branches for their support at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Section 2. From the total amount pledged towards the budget, one-half shall apply to the work of the National Council, one-half to the work of the Diocese.

Section 3. The United Thank Offering and contributions for the Supply Department shall be in addition to the payments on the budget.

## ARTICLE X

### Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present, provided a written copy of the proposed amendments has been filed with the Diocesan Secretary, and a notice of same mailed to each branch by the Secretary at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting.

## BY-LAWS

The place and time of the Annual Meeting shall be approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

1. The order of Business for the Annual Meeting shall be arranged by the President and the Executive Committee.

2. Each Parish Branch having fifty members or less shall be represented by the Branch President and one other delegate (appointed by the President or elected by the Branch). The President, or her representative, and the delegates each has a vote. Each additional fifty members shall entitle the Branch to an additional delegate with power to vote.

3. Each Branch shall be assessed twenty-five cents per member to provide for Provincial Expenses, printing, postage, stationery, traveling expenses of Speakers, and other items necessary for the proper administration of this organization. This shall be known as the Central Fund.

4. One-fourth of the Branches having the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at the Annual Meeting. Five members shall constitute a quorum at the Executive Committee Meetings.

5. The Diocesan President shall appoint at the beginning of her second year of office the following Chairmen, to serve for three years: Chairman of Church Periodical Club; Inter-racial Chairman; Legislative Chairman; Missionary Correspondent; Chairman of Young People's Work.

6. The District Officers shall correspond to the Diocesan Officers and shall be elected at the first meeting of the District after the Diocesan Annual Meeting.

The District Chairman shall appoint the following Chairmen, to serve for three years: (1) Church Periodical Club; (2) Prayer Partnership Correspondent; (3) Young People's Work.

7. Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be the authority in all questions of Parliamentary law not covered by these By-Laws.

8. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates at any Annual Meeting.
