REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC. 1971

Let a graduating senior express what it is like to live in one of our Baptist Children's Homes: "I really do not know how to write about a place which has been so fine, and which has given me the opportunity to worship, work, and learn; not only where we stand in moments of comfort and convenience, but where we stand in moments of challenge and moments of controversy. After all these years, one finally learns that certain values and practices are good and sound and help children to feel secure and happy."

This statement could be made by almost any senior regarding his home and community, for a child in the care of the Baptist Children's Homes has basically the same attitudes and values as other children. He differs from other children only in the tragic experiences which have made it necessary for him to live away from his family. For these children, it is our mission to provide loving care in the spirit of Jesus Christ. We want to work in harmony with what we sense God is doing in the life of each child, enabling the child to tap his own inner resources and grow to responsible adulthood.

The pursuit of this basic goal has led the Children's Homes to develop a variety of services, all family centered. Some families need resident care for their children and for these we have group homes and foster homes. Some families can remain together with outside help and for these we have family services in the form of counseling or financial assistance. For the unmarried girl who is pregnant, we offer maternity care. For the graduate in our care, we assist in higher education. For churches involved in day care, we provide a demonstration program and consultation service. We welcome individual inquiries regarding any of these services as the need may arise.

Our services are made available through strategically located facilities through North Carolina; in the East at Kinston, Pembroke, Fayetteville and Raleigh; in the Piedmont at Chapel Hill, Thomasville and Charlotte; in the West at Asheville and Waynesville.

Staff members and children of the Baptist Children's Homes are grateful for the harmonious relationship we have shared with North Carolina Baptists. The churches have expressed their confidence and support through increased Cooperative Program gifts and a 1970 Thanksgiving Offering of \$380,000. Individuals continue to give generously and to become involved in our varied ministries. We accept this support as an investment in all that we are doing and we pledge ourselves to translate your investment into quality Christian child care.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT TO ASSOCIATIONS, 1971

Your Baptist Hospital admitted 17,557 persons in 1970 for a total of 150,174 days of care. In addition, there were 51,563 visits to outpatient clinics, including 17,241 to the Emergency Room. About 90% of these were "referral" patients—that is, patients who were referred to our Hospital by their local physicians because they needed the specialized medical care our Hospital is staffed and equipped to offer.

Our Hospital, from the day of its beginning, has provided good medical care for our people, including care for persons who cannot pay the cost. There has been great progress in medicine and tremendous increase in hospital costs, and these have made some policy changes necessary. The basic policy of providing care -- now the highly specialized care for the more difficult cases -- for those who cannot pay has not changed. This Christian ministry is at the heart of the work of our Baptist Hospital.

The financial situation of the Hospital is viewed by the administration with "cautious optimism". The operating deficit has been reduced and expenditures are being kept more nearly in line with income. The entire staff is cooperating in an effort to maintain a proper balance between sound financial policies and a spirit of Christian compassion.

The Medical Center Development Program is progressing on schedule. The new patient Tower is expected to be ready for partial occupancy by late 1972. The 14 bed coronary care unit will open about September, 1971. A statewide Development Campaign, initiated with pledges totaling \$177,182 from employees of the Medical Center, is moving toward successful completion.

Baptist Hospital offers a ministry of healing in Christ's name to all who need it. It seeks to fulfill the same purpose in North Carolina that a Baptist Hospital operated by our Foreign Mission Board seeks to fulfill in Korea or Nigeria. It ought to be supported by missionary-minded Baptists with the same enthusiasm and for the same reason we support every other phase of our denomination's World Mission Program. This is missions too.

W. M. U. REPORT

As we approach the end of one associational year and the beginning of another, it is with mixed emotions of accomplishments and failure as we have tried to keep on with our endeavor to teach missions, to lead persons to engage in mission action, and to lead persons to support missions through prayer and giving.

The two churches in our association with W.M.U. organizations have held churchwide mission studies, meaningful weeks of prayer activities and have seen increased giving through the Cooperative Program and special mission offerings to Foreign, Home and State Missions.

We have one active ungraded G.A. organization which, with some help from the Baptist Women, from both churches, sponsored a Christmas Party for the 80 residents of the Glen Haven Rest Home. It resulted in a very happy experience for all participating. These girls were also involved in observing the Weeks of Prayer and giving for our special seasons of prayer. We cannot estimate the influence of the mission teaching and involvement in the lives of these 18 girls, but think of the ones who are being neglected because we are so busy about so many other things.

Our Baptist Women of the two organizations have carried on a mission action ministry to the rest home residents by taking the names of individuals each month on their birthdays and remembering them with a visit and a gift. They have also assisted in providing a worship service for them.

We note, also, that though Scottville does not have an organized W.M.U. they have contributed generously to the special offerings for missions through the year.

As we try to "Live the Spirit of Christ in Expectancy and Creativity" as suggested in our denominational theme for 1971-72, may we as Christians become more deeply committed to Christ. Let your Associational WMU officers help your church organize a W.M.U.

Evangelism, what is it? Most of the Christian family considers it to be an emotionalism of sorts; that is to be stirred up in people, by a loud and often outspoken preacher. Others may think of Evangelism as a one-time a year affair, that we report to our sister churches at the annual meeting.

Evangelism may or may not be emotional, as it depends upon the individual. Some of the greatest movements in Evangelizing were born not out of emotionalism but rather from unwavering commitments to Jesus Christ. It is for sure that Evangelism cannot be just one a year thing. Evangelism and the call to evangelize is to be an every day part of the Christian's life. We are to Evangelize where we

are, with what we are doing.

This past spring this Association of Churches sponsored a county wide mission aimed at Evangelism. Led by Dr. Julian Hopkins, we were challenged in depth to full commitment in Christ and the call of Evangelism. However the evangelizing must come from the people. From the ranks and files of our churches, must our people respond to the call of Christ and be evangelist. We must become involved wherever we are, on the job, in the home, and in social activities.

This is the spirit of Evangelism.




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

NEW RIVER BAPTIST CHURCH HISTORY

(1971)

In the fourteenth chapter of Job and the fourteenth verse Job asked the question, "If a man die shall he live again?" How about a church, if a church dies can it live again? Yes, is the answer, for New River Baptist Church has.

A small church by this name was founded in the community of Nile, North Carolina in 1898 with Reverend James Shumate as pastor. The church disbanded in 1905, soon after the decease of the founding pastor. This information was in an old Alleghany-Grayson Associational minute. The Nile post office also has been discontinued.

Evidently, several years later some of these North Carolina Baptist joined Brush Creek Baptist Church in Virginia. Due to long distance travel to attend worship services some of these members decided to organize a church in Alleghany County, not far from the original New River Church. They invited the Virginia pastors to aid in organizing a church in the Toliver school house on October 15, 1939.

After Rev. L. W. Sturdivant delivered the sermon Rev. Kyle Taylor presided at the organizational meeting and W. L. Wingate acted as clerk. They proceeded to elect Rev. Taylor as pastor and Homer Rector as church clerk. The name chosen was the same as the first one -- The New River Baptist Church.

The church was named for the New River that divides North Carolina from Virginia in this community. This river is well known for its clean clear water that flows gently to join the Kanawha, Ohio, and Mississippi Rivers before its water reaches the Gulf of Mexico.

Charlie Pollard and Oscar Shumate (grandson of the Rev. James Shumate) were elected deacons. They were largely instrumental in establishing the church along with Annie Whittaker, Mollie Maines, Ruth Whittaker, J. P. Maines, Bessie Rector, Pauline Mabe, Maggie Shumate, and Phoebe Maines (who died on September 10, 1970 at the ripe old age of 96). All these secured letters of dismissal from the Brush Creek Church in Virginia.

The church grew in numbers and made plans to erect a church of native stone from local quarries. The present church with vestibule and two Sunday School rooms was completed in 1949. The lot was donated by Mr. and Mrs. Odell Edwards, Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Pollard, and Mr. and Mrs. James Maines. The stone was given by The Alex Woodruff Family and Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Shumate.

It is of interest to know that the stone from the large quarry was used in the over-head bridges on the Blue Ridge Parkway at Cherry Lane and Laurel Springs. Ed Rigoti (native of Italy), who was a skilled stone-mason, cut the stone and did the mason work on the church. R. S. Maines and other local men did the wood work. Most of the lumber was furnished by Misses Pearl and Ruby Woodruff, who were the leading advisors and generous friends of the church. Miss Ruby Woodruff was elected treasurer of the building committee. Her friend, Miss Belva Calloway of High Point (and native of Ashe County) gave liberal aid and help. Additional contributors, too numerous to mention, included the Baptist State Convention, a governor, a congressman, pastors and Baptist in other churches in addition to the members of the New River Church who also gave time and monev.

The beautiful picture window of "Christ knocking at the door" was a gift in memory of Lucille Goldston, the pulpit was given by Mrs. H. Bartmire of High Point and in 1964 the pews were donated by H. H. Carter of Roanoak.

The New River Church was dedicated, debt free, in 1958 when Rev. Carlie McKnight delivered the dedicatory sermon. After the close of the services a bountiful picnic lunch was served on the grounds.

The church became a member of the Alleghany Baptist Association and has co-operated along with other churches in having the clerk's book microfilmed. The records are stored in the vaults of Wake Forest University and in the Archives of History in Raleigh.

Sunday School and Vacation Bible Schools are of inestimable value in teaching the Word of God.

In 1955 the church licensed Jessie L. Davis to preach

and in 1959 J. H. Mayhan was ordained as a minister. The schedule of worship services have been varied from full time to once-a-month preaching.

The folding doors to the Sunday School rooms enlarge the sanctuary when additional space is needed. These rooms were painted in 1961 when the stoves were replaced with electric heat. Within the last year, the church was reroofed and a lawn sign erected.

According to the records Revs. Kyle Taylor, John Adams, John Edwards, Bradley Mays, and Herschel Johnson have served as pastors. There have been three clerks during the thirty-four years namely: Homer Rector, Robert L. Reeves, and Robert L. Anders. The deacons have been: Oscar Shumate, Charlie Pollard, Robert Shumate, and James Pollard.

Christians should continue to labor with confidence knowing there will continue to be great changes. The Holy Book tells us about the Ten Commandments which our permissive society has come to ignore. It also tells us about the Man who walked briefly on earth and changed the whole world course of history by His teaching. If we but listen we can hear Him say today to the strife torn weary world, "I am the way, the truth, and the life". - John 14:6.

REPORT OF THE BAPTIST HOSPITAL

The distinctiveness of Baptist Hospital's ministry lies not alone in its care for charity patients, but also in the type of service it renders to all its patients, and to many people throughout our state and nation and around the world.

As an academic Medical Center it is engaged in research and in education, as well as direct patient care. The ministry through research is far-reaching since new discoveries in medicine offer new hope to people everywhere. The educational ministry also extends around the world, since graduates of the Bowman Gray School of Medicine serve in 88 counties of North Carolina, in 47 states and the District of Columbia, and in 25 different countries. Alumni of the School of Pastoral Care serve in almost every state and in 39 other countries.

The quality of direct patient care provided at Baptist Hospital is distinct in at least two respects. First, it is a specialized type of medical care, provided for referral patients who have rare or complicated medical problems. Because of highly-skilled specialists in almost every area of medicine, and the elaborate equipment available for diagnosis and treatment, we are able to provide the kind of care which is available for use only in a large medical center. Ours is one of only 108 medical centers in the U.S.

In addition to offering this kind of medical expertist, a second distinctive of our patient care is the Christian concern for the total person with all his needs. This spirit is found among physicians, nurses, aides, and other personnel throughout the Center. The Department of Pastoral

Care seeks to minister specifically to the spiritual and emotional needs of patients and their families.

Baptist Hospital does continue to serve patients who cannot pay for their hospital care. Even with the tightening of admission policies and procedures, only one person in twelve months—i. e., one in approximately 17,000 applications for admissions—was not helped. In 1971, charitable allowances amounting to \$1,370,000 were issued to patients unable to pay in full. The Mother's Day Offering of \$371,000 helped make this charity work possible.

The hospital takes pride in its record of charitable work, but would like to help our Baptist people to understand that there are other aspects of its work also which justify its existence as an institution of our Convention and make it worthy of the support of our churches.

The operating deficit has been eliminated and the hospital is now operating "in the Black".

The new patient tower is being completed and some

The new patient tower is being completed and some departments have already moved into the lower levels. Complete occupation should take place by Jan. 1973. One additional unit, a two story unit housing the emergency room and outpatient clinic, is scheduled to be completed by 1973. This will conclude the present development program.

"A Medical Center ministering with skill and understanding" is not just a letterhead slogan; it is a goal which Baptist Hospital seriously strives to attain.

MISSIONS REPORT

We are told in Matthew 28:19 to go into all the world and make disciples. Our purpose for supporting missions at all levels is to make disciples for Jesus Christ. Missions strengthens and lengthens the arm of your local church.

State missions, under the direction of Howard J. Ford in Raleigh, assist local churches in the development and promotion of local church programs, or aid in the development of a new Baptist witness at a new location. Some State Mission projects are located in special areas where no one church or association can maintain a ministry alone such as in resort ministries, metropolitan missions, interracial cooperation, work among the deaf, work among the Indians, and ministrying to mission workers. Other areas of State Missions work can be seen in the form of seminars, workshops, and other training opportunities for leaders in the churches.

Home Missions, under the direction of Arthur B. Rutledge in Atlanta, Georgia, seek to provide a uniform Southern Baptist missions program for the U. S. A. and assigned territories. The Board's motto, "Our Land for Christ" reflects this aim. The Home Missions Board assists churches in evangelism, chaplaincy ministries, pioneer missions in rural as well as urban settings, language missions, christian social ministries, and work with National Baptists and nonevangelicals. The number of home missionaries serving during the year averaged 2,229 serving in all fifty of the states, Puerto Rico, and Panama.

Foreign Missions, under the direction of Baker J. Cauthen in Richmond, Va., proclaims the Gospel at overseas mission points. On Jan. 1, 1972 Southern Baptist missionaries numbering 2,526 were under appointment to seventy-five geographical or political entities. The program

of evangelism and church development includes many types of ministry: radio and television, English-language churches, lay-leadership training, stewardship promotion, camps and conferences for all age groups.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT OF 1972

The Annuity Board has record funds held in trust of more than \$292 million, as of December 31, 1971. These funds are held in trust for 36,000 retirement plan participants now active in churches and denominational agencies.

The same good yield on investments that permitted extra benefits to annuitants also gave Good Experience Credits (credits for good experience in investing) to active members of the various plans, adding value to their retirement fund being built up.

The board, in its 54 years of existence, had paid out benefits that total \$92.1 million, including over \$10 million during 1971. The Board is now in a position not only to fully meet every outstanding contract with members, but to grant Good Experience Credit as well.

The Annuity Board offers a protection plan for disability, death, and retirement to cover every pastor, church staff member, and denominational agency employee. Many churches help by paying in full the dues for their pastor and staff.

Retirement contributions may be made on the full salaries of pastors and other personnel by taking advantage of Plans B and C as well as Plan A.



BELVIEW BAPTIST CHURCH HISTORY 1972

While engaged in research of Alleghany Baptist Association it was found that the Belview Baptist Church was listed in the statistical roll of churches in the minutes of the Alleghany-Ashe Association in 1896 to 1898. church located at Furches, North Carolina sent delegates to the association and reported nineteen members with Rev. Frank B. Cheek as pastor, J. W. Phouts as church clerk, and Rev. T. M. Duncan as associational missionary. A man born in 1888 remembered accompanying his grandmother, Mrs. Sallie Roberts Upchurch, to worship services held here in a school building. The first floor of this twostory frame building was used for a two-teacher school. The second floor was occupied by a Masonic Lodge. In later years the school was consolidated with Nathans Creek, the Lodge united with Sparta Masons and the building was sold and torn down.

The present frame church building with seating capacity of around one hundred-fifty, was constructed soon after Belview Baptist Church was re-organized May 9, 1909. The Rev. George M. Reeves, who was a resident of the community, was elected pastor. He was given credit for this endeavor with the cooperation of the good people

living here at that time. L. S. Richardson was the clerk and Shade Plummer the deacon. There were twenty-one members in 1909. The two last named and W. F. Jones were sent as delegates that same year, to the Alleghany and Grayson Association held at Liberty Baptist Church. At this session the name of the association was changed for the second time. The original name was Ashe and Alleghany Baptist Association. In 1897 the name was changed, as was the geographical territory to Alleghany and Grayson. Since 1909 the Association has consisted only of churches in Alleghany County and has been known as the Alleghany Baptist Association.

The Rev. Billy Graham, who is recognized as the world's leading exponent of evangelism of our day, said "My first responsibility is to win men to Christ". Undoubtedly, this is the chief aim of all our churches. Records show that Belview Church has promoted evangelism, Sunday Schools, missions, Cooperative Program, orphanage and other benevolences that are sponsored by the North Carolina Baptist Convention which was organized in 1830—some 15 years before the Southern Baptist Convention was.

Mrs. Laura Plummer gave the church an organ to aid in music and in 1957 J. T. Fender of Whitehead pro-

vided in his will a gift of one hundred dollars for the "upkeep and maintenance of the church and grounds". In 1952 the church purchased a piano to replace the organ.

In 1923 the Alleghany Association was divided in two fields. This created a need for another pastor's home. The next year the Belview parsonage was purchased for a home for the ministers of the Western Pastoral Division. This sixroom house on the twenty acre farm was paid for by individuals' donations of Belview and the other churches in the association. The Rev. H. L. Coffee and family were the first pastor's family to occupy this home.

In the thirties many changes were taking place in this area with the coming of electricity, better roads, better schools, better homes and better churches, etc. The Association deemed it necessary that a pastorium be nearer the center of the county. Therefore about 1937, by order of the association, the Belview parsonage was sold for one thousand two hundred fiifty dollars and the land on the north side of the highway of the fortyacre Whitehead parsonage for three hundred fifty dollars. This one thousand six hundred dollars was invested in a new brick-house and lot on Whitehead Street in Sparta. The Rev. Howard Ford's were the first to live in this Alleghany Baptist Associational pastorium. Some years later this was sold and invested in a larger pastorium on South Main Street of town.

Belview Church was host to the Association in 1912, 1919, 1927, 1933, 1942, 1953 and this year. It has cooperated with the other Baptist churches of the Association in having the two church clerk's books microfilmed. The 1964 record is stored in the vault of Wake Forest University in Winston-Salem and the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention in Nashville. The 1971 record is in the North Carolina Archives of History in Raleigh.

Since March, 1971 the church has moved rapidly forward. The Rev. Jimmy Warden was elected pastor then, with Juanita Church as church clerk and Lessie Shepherd as treasurer.

The time of worship has been changed to full time with Sunday School every Sunday. Successful Vacation Bible Schools have been conducted for the two past summers and there have been additions to the church membership.

Noticeable improvements have been made by repairs and painting the building at the cost of seven hundred dollars. With donations of labor, the grounds have been beautified. An oil heater, tables, and additional songbooks have been purchased.

It has been pointed out that pastors have been: Rev. F. B. Cheek, George M. Reeves, T. M. Hayes, W. L. Hoppers, C. M. Cope, S. L. Blevins, J. A. Blevins, S. A. Stroup, Roby L. Burkett, H. L. Coffee, J. L. Underwood, Bill Burchett, C. H. McKnight, A. F. Absher, R. G. Blackburn, W. H. Caldwell, Bill Shiflett, Bob Laws, Brise Barton, Fred Blevins, Lee Woodruff, Douglas Halsey, Walter Stephens, Hayes McClure, Jimmy Warden, and Julian Hopkins who was secretary of Evangelism of the Baptist State Convention for several years.

Church clerks were: J. W. Phouts, L. S. Richardson, W. F. Jones, C. E. Jones, Fred Pruitt, Maggie Atwood, Dempsey Blevins, Roy Church, and Juanita Church.

Deacons serving were: Shade Plummer, C. L. Upchurch, W. F. Jones, C. E. Jones, Walter Taylor, S. L. Richardson, Fred Pruitt, Alex Brown, Roy Church, Dempsey Blevins and R. S. Warden, Jr.

Trustees were: C. E. Jones, Alex Brown, Roy Church and W. G. Shepherd.

As Christians living in these turbulent times, we all realize the importance-indeed the necessity-of well qualified and properly motivated leaders. The young people of today will be heir to our problems and our achieve-They will be called upon to shape the destiny of our nation. The job will be perplexing one but I am confident with proper training and development such as that provided by the churches our youth will persevere. We need to pray that the Holy Spirit will infuse all of us with the power of God, so we will be possessed with the burden to do what-ever God has called us to do. "Ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you and ye shall be witness unto me both in Jerusalem and Judea and in Samaria and unto the uttermost part of the earth." Acts 1:8. These were the last Bible-recorded words of Jesus to His disciples.

THE BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME REPORT

This year it was my experience to visit The Baptist Children's Home in Thomasville and talk with many that are connected in doing the fine work that is going on for the benefit of Christian influence. Mr. Parker McLendon allowed us to visit in the home where both boys and girls were staying as a family type unit. The new homes are designed to have two wingsone for the boys and one wing for the girls. This allows a family of a sister and brother to live under the same roof, therefore not creating a broken home situation.

Each cottage is given an opportunity to save money on food, clothing, and etc. The winner is presented with extra money to buy recreation type equipment. Each cottage grows their own garden and each cottage cans its own food. The girls and boys both are responsible for their own rooms and also help with assigned chores around the cottage. High School age students attend the high school in Thomasville and are allowed to work downtown if a job is available. Therefore I find it very much like any home in Alleghany County.

There is a need for more cottages as the dormitory-like structures are either outdated or condemned. Each Association is asked to contribute to the co-operative program. This association sends enough money to keep one child approximately 6 months. I would like for each church in our association to send a Sunday School Class down and visit at the home and see the good work going on and then I believe each church would want to give more to this program.

Most students come from troubled homes, but after an average stay of 2 1/2 years they usually return home to a satisfactory home environment. (More times than you can imagine workers are sent to the home of the parents to work out the undesirable influences.)

Many people are now leaving a portion of their earthly goods to the home in their wills. This is certainly something for everyone to consider and I strongly urge that we support this home because of the fine Christian influence & good to mankind that it is now presently doing.

A. The department has more than 2,650 free rental films, covering every aspect of denominational endeavor, that are available to churches.

B. Film Production

Among the films available are The Dare To Be, a 45 minute sound color motion picture emphasizing the value of Christian education and God Said Go, a color motion picture illustrating the contributions made by people in Ashe and Alleghany to the Baptist life of the state through the life of Rev. J. F. Fletcher, pioneer missionary in this area.

C. Audio Aids

There are more than 500 master messages on tape in the library.

Statewide news releases, radio, and television productions are another service of this department.

BROTHERHOOD REPORT

The Brotherhood work covers two main divisions: Royal Ambassadors for boys and Baptist Men for men. The R. A. program is for boys in grades 1-12. "Pioneers" designates the boys in grades 1-6 and "Crusaders" is the name for boys in grades 7-12. These groups are designed to involve men and boys in mission study and mission action. The Baptist Men's Journal is the basic resource for men's mission studies.

The Sparta Church is the only Church reporting Brotherhood work this year. They had a Dads' and Lads' Breakfast on Father's Day, participated in the Home and Foreign Mission studies with the W.M.U., helped promote the offering for Drew Choate to participate in the "Sports Ambassadors" mission project to Latin America, and helped support other local mission projects of the church. The officers attended the annual area Brotherhood meeting at North Wilkesboro. A workshop for Brotherhood leaders to be conducted by representatives of the State Brotherhood office is planned for September 19. Each church is urged to consider men for missions this year.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS 1973

In May of this year Baptist Hospital observed its 50th Anniversary. The hospital opened its doors in May of 1923 "to bring the healing art more definitely under the dominion of the Great Healer."

The anniversary was celebrated jointly with the dedication of the new Reynolds Tower, a 16-story patient care facility. The completion of the Tower brings the total bed capacity to 655, placing Baptist Hospital within the top 10 per cent (in size) among hospitals in the United States. When the renovation of older sections of the hospital is completed the total number of beds will be 717.

Construction has begun on an ambulatory care building which will house the emergency room, several outpatient clinics, the Physical Therapy Department, and an Oncology (Cancer) clinic and Research Laboratory. This building and the above-mentioned renovation will complete the present Medical Center Development Program.

Last November the Baptist State Convention heard the report of the Committee of 15 and adopted its recommendations. The hospital has been seeking to implement these recommendations:

1. A Medical Center Committee, composed of 8 Trustees from the Baptist Hospital Board and 8 from the Wake Forest University Board, has been appointed. This committee will consider matters involving the Medical Center and its future operation.

2. In January the hospital trustees appointed a committee of three to review appropriations from the Mother's Day fund and assist hospital personnel in making decisions on some specific requests for assistance. The hospital continues to provide care for people who cannot pay, valued at far in excess of the total Mother's Day Offerings. The auditors' confirmed value of this care in 1972 was \$1,390,000-nearly four times the amount of the Mother's Day Offerings--and this does not include the value of physician's service, provided without cost to these service patients.

3. The Department of Pastoral Care is expanding its services to provide training for lay people. Dr. Mahan Siler joined the staff June 1 to head up this new work. The Department also anticipates the establishment of several satelite counseling and training centers in the state, beginning in the near future. Your Cooperative Program gifts support

the work of this department.

The hospital's financial operation is "in the black", and there has not been a general room rate increase in 2 1/2 years. As of this date, the Mother's Day Offerings are running ahead of last year.

As you know, the RECORDER has for years led the fight against liquor by the drink. Now the issue is up to the people in a statewide referendum on November 6. The RECORDER will continue to give you information that will help win this fight against the liquor interest and those who would profit from liquor by the drink if this passes--which we hope and pray it won't. If individual Baptists will become as concerned about this evil as the RECORDER is, a great victory for de-

cency will be won in November.

REPORT OF THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

The American Bible Society and the Southern Baptist Convention work cooperatively as partners in sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ to people around the world. This is a tremendous challenge, calling for the widest possible distribution of the Scripture. Since the eternal truths of the Bible speak to the heart and mind of man, the sole purpose and mission of the Bible Societies is to make God's Word available

to all men everywhere in a language and form they can easily read and understand and at a price they can afford.

To fulfill this urgent need, the Bible Societies have embarked on an ambitious program for the development of Scripture Literacy Selections to meet the rapidly mounting rate of literacy growth around the globe. This program is being built on the theme: "Let the Word Speak."

Graded Scriptures are being designed on five progressive reading levels to lead new readers from literacy primer levels to reading levels of the normal common language. Before the end of the decade, these Scripture Literacy Selections will be prepared in 100 languages.

At the present time, nearly 97% of the world's people can secure at least a portion of the Bible in their own language. Approximately 3,000 translators are presently at work on some

600 new translations and revisions.

During the past six years Southern Baptists have led all other U. S. denominations in their gifts to the ABS. SBC gifts in 1972 were \$233,752. Gifts from your church may be sent to your State Baptist Convention office marked "for the American Bible Society."

1973 ASSOCIATIONAL BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc., is a charitable corporation, chartered under the laws of the State of North Carolina by the Baptist State Convention in 1920. The Foundation, as an agency of the Convention, encourages, receives, and manages gifts and bequests for benefit of all Baptist institutions, agencies, and causes fostered and supported by the North Carolina and Southern Baptist Conventions. The Foundation is not a competitive agency, but a service agency dedicated to the task of undergirding all Baptist work. It encourages the donor to use the local church as a channel for directing the income from Foundation trusts to the benefiting cause. The operating expense of the Foundation is received from the Cooperative Program of the Convention.

The Foundation Executive Secretary is available to assist churches and individuals interested in a program of perpetual stewardship, particularly as it relates to estate planning, involving gifts to Baptist institutions, agencies, and causes. The Foundation provides a means for establishing trusts to

benefit these Christian causes as well as providing an opportunity for perpetual stewardship witness. Through gifts of property, cash, or securities during lifetime, donors and/or other beneficiaries can receive annuities from the Foundation during their lifetime, and can also receive certain tax benefits provided for such gifts.

Responsibilities for the administration of the Foundation is vested in a fifteen-member board of directors elected by the Baptist State Convention. The present board consists of thirteen prominent and successful business and professional men and women and two outstanding pastors, all of whom are dedicated to the best management of the sacred trust funds now placed in the Foundation. The investment policy calls for investment in quality securities with diversification, good income, and balanced growth potential.

At the fiscal year ending June 30, 1972, the cost of inventory value of all securities, notes and principal cash of all funds being administered by the Foundation exceeded \$713,560.00, (real estate not included). During the preceding year, beneficiaries of existing trusts were paid, \$23,483.82. A total of \$105,531.08 has been paid to Baptist institutions, agencies, and causes during the past five years from the income of

invested Foundation funds.

ANNUITY BOARD OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION--1973

The Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention this year added new benefits or increased benefits for most active and retired pastors, church staff members and denominational workers it serves.

For annuitants (retirees, widows, and disabled persons) on the roll December 31, 1972, monthly income checks have been permanently increased by 6 percent. Just before Christmas, 1972, more than 7,000 annuitants received "13th Checks" amounting to the size of two extra months' benefits. The "13th Checks" are paid in addition to the regular monthly payments.

More than 9,000 insurance policyholders transferred from the previous Health Benefit Plan with Blue Cross-Blue Shield to the new plan begun January 1, 1973 with Aetna Life Insurance Company.

The Board reported several records for its operations in 1972. Funds held in trust for over 38,000 participants in retirement plans passed \$300 million for the first time. Investment income reached a new high for 1972 of more than \$22 million. Retirement and other protection benefits paid out for the 12-month period surpassed \$10 million for the first time.

The total amount of money paid in "13th Checks" exceeded one million dollars, also for the first time. Good investment results in 1972 on funds held to pay benefits account for this dividend.

Income from premiums and dues topped \$30 million, another record.

As of June 1, 1973-2 Churches in the Alleghany Association were participating in the Retirement Program.

SKETCH ON REV. J. F. Fletcher (1973)

The subject of this sketch is about the late Rev. James Floyd Fletcher who was a minister of great vision and consecration in the Alleghany Baptist Association from 1905 to 1908. His work was varied, having served as pastor on delectate enterprizes and as moderator of this association two terms.

When Rev. Ezekiel Blevins resigned and moved from the Whitehead parsonage (purchased in 1904) the Rev. J. F.

Fletcher of Ashe Association accepted the call to the field of Alleghany Baptist Churches. The Fletcher family were the first to occupy the new two-story pastorium as he served as pastor of Laurel Springs, Liberty, New Hope, and Sparta churches. It was the custom at that time for a pastor to visit each church once a month. He conducted worship services on Saturday morning and followed with a business session. After lunch in a home a visitation program was usually observed and the night was spent in the Community. On Sunday the pastor attended Sunday School and delivered a sermon at eleven o'clock, and after lunch he returned home on horseback or in a buggy. However about 1920 the Alleghany Association purchased a car for the pastor's disposal.

Rev. J. F. Fletcher was born in Ashe County in 1858 and was licensed to preach in Bethel Baptist Church in 1876, at the age of eighteen. Soon thereafter he entered upon his first pastorate at White Top Church. His last was at Youngs Chapel at Mouth of Wilson, Virginia, where he was buried. He married Louisa Baker and reared nine children to manhood and womanhood, two of which became prodigious and distinguished citizens. They were Colonel Arthur L. and A. J. (Fred) Fletcher.

The oldest son, Colonel Arthur Fletcher, was author of the book, "A History of Ashe County". A. J. (Fred) Fletcher is a successful attorney in Raleigh. He is the generous benefactor of the recently renamed "Rev. J. F. Fletcher Memorial Baptist Church" of Jefferson; the Oak Hill High School (which his father was instrumental in establishing) and the North Carolina Baptist Convention by producing the film "God Said Go". This film portrays the life of his father as a home missionary in this area.

The educational opportunity of Rev. Fletcher was meager but by reading and diligent study he acquired a good education. He enriched his mind with a practical store of Biblical and useful facts. This enabled him to write a valuable reference book titled "A History of Ashe (N. C.) and New River (Va.) Associations in 1935. He was a strong advocate of schools for the Baptist young people and especially the clergy.

During the long ministry of seventy years of Rev. Fletcher in Alleghany, Ashe, and Davidson Counties in North Carolina and Grayson County, Virginia, there were thousands of lives touched and blessed by his teaching and preaching. He organized at least twelve churches.

This fine pastor also spent the evening of his life in his beloved mountains where he was laid to rest in 1945.

ACHIEVEMENTS OF CHURCHES IN 1972-73

Last year Southern Baptist passed the twelve million mark in membership in the fifty states. An increase in membership is expected this year for Baptist is one of the major protestant denominations to join in the North American continent evangelistic movement, called "Key "73". Hopefully a new desire for the indwelling of the Holy Spirit will permeate thousands of individuals in the year of 1973.

"Share the Word now", the theme of this association, is a timely and challenging one. Our churches need to share the Word Because there are more problems in the world than ever before. The Word of God is the solution to these problems. That was why nearly two thousand years ago "The word was made flesh and dwelt among us." John 1:14a

Practically all churches in the Alleghany Association conducted a vacation Bible School, and held at least one revival. Perhaps Scottville had the largest number of additions with

thirty-one new members and Pine Fork thirty.

Thanks are extended to the church clerks for tabulating the reports as follows:

Belview: Renovated church by adding suspended ceiling; paneled walls, rewired church and installed new light fixtures; purchased new double doors, refinished floors, painted pews and woodwork.

Chestnut Grove: Carpeted two class rooms, purchased drapes and thirty-two chairs for same, built storage closet, constructed picnic table, had attendance of seventy at Vacation Bible School, insured church for \$20,000; celebrated seventy-fifth anniversary and cleared \$300 at food sale.

Laurel Springs: Built addition to church which includes an assembly room with fire place, installed water system with a kitchen and two rest rooms. Note: (Stated) "This is nearing completion and members are pleased to have these conveniences and extra space for the use of the church."

Liberty: Erected two picnic tables, carpeted two SS rooms, purchased a dehydrator for basement, bought two dozen additional Baptist Hymnals, replaced louvers in bellfry and gables, gave \$272 to aid rebuild a church and home destroyed by fire, and help pay hospitalization for two individuals, and paid \$500 on indebtedness on building fund.

Mt. Carmel: Still paying on building improvements.

New Hope: Laid inlaid tile on basement floor, installed fixtures in two restrooms, set up trust fund for upkeep and maintenance of church cemetery.

Osborne Memorial: Built fence around church property.

Pine Fork: Purchased bus, constructed utility building, purchased rug and 25 chairs for SS room, continued to support 30 minute radio program, were presented two collection plates by the pastor that he brought from the Holy Land.

Scottville: Purchased new piano, completed pastors study, worked on SS rooms, improved parking lot (leveled and graveled.)

Sparta, First: Renovated vestibule, refinished floor in sanctuary and laid new carpet, installed new light fixtures; refinished wood work in sanctuary, installed tone cabinets for electric organ and painted the educational building on the inside.





THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC.

Realizing that one of the greatest sources of loss to the cause of Christ has been the death of Christians who leave their estates to heirs indifferent to Christ and His claims, Baptists of North Carolina, meeting in convention in 1919, authorized the establishment of The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc. It was chartered in 1920 by the State as an agency whose duties included cultivation of Living Memorials, through gifts in life and in the writing of Christian wills, and to administer such funds in behalf of the donor supporting any or all Baptist work, locally or convention-wide.

Today, as during its early years, The North Carolina Baptist Foundation's Board of Directors is keenly conscious of the need of an enduring financial support for Baptist institutions

and agencies.

The value of Foundation assets is approaching two million dollars. During 1973-74, the Foundation received gifts amounting to \$150,310.15. A major portion of these gifts was for the establishment of annuity trust funds, providing income to the donor or his survivor, with the residual beneficiary to be a Baptist institution, agency, or cause. 10.08% of all gifts received during the year will eventually benefit SBC causes beyond the State.

Income distributed by the Foundation this year amounted to \$47,858.74. Approximately \$6,700.00 of income was reinvested

by the Foundation in accordance with instructions from the donors.

There are various services offered by the Foundation, with two major ones being, the Life Income Trust and the Charitable Remainder Annuity Trust. Other services will be upcoming in the near future. REPORT OF THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY TO SOUTHERN BAPTIST ASSOCIATIONS

Supplying the millions of men, women and children who become new readers each year with Scriptures they can understand, is seen by the American Bible Society as one of the

most pressing of the many challenges facing it today.

To bring the Word of God to every person in the world has, of course, always been the sole purpose of the Society. To do so it has engaged in hundreds of programs of Scripture translation, publication and distribution by cooperating with churches and agencies that need Scriptures. But even with all these programs, the Bible Society is aware that a large part of the world's people are not being reached, those whose reading ability is new or marginal.

GOOD NEWS FOR NEW READERS

Now there is GOOD NEWS FOR NEW READERS, a unique and extensive program that will provide special Scripture Literacy Selections on five graded levels, in 200 languages. It will enable millions of people to read the Word of God for themselves, as well as other reading material, for the first time, thus providing a basis for a more abundant life.

Over the next twelve years, 725 million Selections will be required at a cost of over \$62,000,000. Already two levels are complete in 112 languages. Their ready acceptance indicates the great spiritual hunger of the world's people and the need for these unique tools. Nothing else like them exists anywhere

in any language!

PARTNERS IN BASIC MISSION

The American Bible Society, working through the United Bible Societies, continues to be the primary source of Scriptures for the missionary enterprise and remains constantly ready to supply the Southern Baptists' Scriptural needs in the United States and abroad.

In behalf of the Southern Baptist Convention and several of its state and local organizations, the American Bible Society has produced 16 special Scripture editions totaling over 3 million copies in 1973.

SCRIPTURE DISTRIBUTION UP 14.1 PER CENT, NOW IN MORE THAN 1.526 LANGUAGES

More than 249 million Scriptures—Bibles, New Testaments, Portions and Selections—were distributed during 1973 by the members of the United Bible Societies. The world total is up by 14.1 per cent over 1972. In the United States, the total Scripture distribution was over 117 million—a bit less than the 1972 all-time record. The number of languages in which at least one book of the Bible has been published by Bible Societies and other Christian organizations increased by 26 in 1973 to 1.526.

The world's bestselling paperback book, "Good News for Modern Man," the American Bible Society's New Testament in Today's English Version (TEV) reached a total circulation of more than 43 million copies by the end of 1973. TEV translation work on the Old Testament continues in preparation for the publication of the complete Bible in 1976. This translation continues to be a model for common-language work in other tongues.

OTHER PROJECTS

The American Bible Society continues to bring new color and formats to the Scriptures produced. Distribution continues in the work for the blind with Scriptures in Braille, tape, and records. Work with Armed Forces Chaplains continues as well as work with Blacks, American Indians, Spanish, and other minority groups. The Volunteer Activities Department of the American Bible Society is growing rapidly.

WORK ABROAD

In missionary fields abroad, the American Bible Society is proving its effectiveness in areas of particular interest to the Southern Baptist Convention. Bible Society work is undergirding the activity of churches in Brazil, Nigeria, Japan, Indonesia, and other countries where the Southern Baptist Convention has active missions. Scripture Literacy Selections are being used effectively to involve more and more of the population in the Word of God. Translation and production of commonstrations.

language Scriptures continues to increase as Bible Society work rapidly expands in many countries.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT

The American Bible Society is most grateful for its close and continuing relationship with the Southern Baptist Convention in the common purpose of Scripture distribution. However, the Society is facing growing demands for Scriptures in a world whose population is growing and whose people have a growing need for the saving knowledge of the Gospel. Therefore, the Society asks Southern Baptist churches to continue their active support and to make special efforts to support the GOOD NEWS FOR NEW READERS program.

We know we have the urgent responsibility and glorious challenge of making God's Word available to all who need and want it. This is more than a responsibility for the Bible Societies. It is a responsibility which all Christians must recognize and

to which all must respond generously.

1974 BIBLICAL RECORDER REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS

The BIBLICAL RECORDER is grateful for another good year, although these are difficult days for religious publications. Some have had to go out of business while others are squeezed by rising costs. The RECORDER has not escaped the pressures of inflation. For example, paper has risen 61 per cent already this year—and the end is not in sight.

Even so, the RECORDER has been in business for 141 years and expects to continue. A few changes have to be made, however, to keep the paper strong. As staff members have resigned or retired, they have not been replaced. Some weeks the number of pages has to be reduced to save money, but

readers have been very understanding.

Despite some problems, the RECORDER is enjoying its highest circulation in history—more than 111,000—thanks to the continuing support of the vast majority of Baptist churches in the state. These churches and their members remember the part the RECORDER played in the overwhelming defeat of liquor by the drink last November. This is probably the most

significant story that the RECORDER has reported since the associations met last year. You will remember that approximately 70 per cent of the voters in the state voted against liquor by the drink and it was defeated in 97 of 100 counties. This should take care of this issue for awhile.

The RECORDER will continue its emphasis on local church coverage, seeking to deal with problems that every church has. Naturally, we are prejudiced, but we do not believe any publication can take the place of the BIBLICAL RECORDER. If your church does not send it to every family, may we ask a simple question: Why? At a cost of only a nickel a week for each family, this is the best investment a Baptist church can make. Put the RECORDER in the budget before it has to increase the rate because of inflation.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT, 1974

In spite of the growth in size and complexity at your Baptist Hospital, the emphasis is still upon "ministering with skill and understanding." Evidence of this is a typical patient's remark recently: "From the head surgeon to the aide who

handed me a glass of water, with all the doctors, nurses, people in the business offices and chaplains in between, I was

cheerfully given every personal consideration."

Changes and additions continue to be made for the purpose of providing better hospital care. Renovation of the Progressive Care Unit has been completed, and the South and West Wings of the hospital building are now being renovated. Construction of the Ambulatory Care Unit is well under way and is scheduled for completion in the spring, or early summer, of 1975.

New discoveries continue to make possible better medical care. For example, a new EMI-Scanner is to be installed and is expected to be in use before the end of this year. This device, which combines the use of x-rays and computors, will make it possible to detect brain tumors, blood clots, and strokes more accurately and more quickly. Scans can be available in another five minutes. There is no risk or discomfort involved, and the patient does not have to be admitted to the hospital.

New approaches are also being made in the hospital's ministry to the emotional and spiritual needs of people. The Division of Human Enrichment seminars, and workshops designed to help appropriate the resources of the Christian faith to the various areas and experiences of life. The Pastoral Care Department has also opened its first satellite center, in Fayetteville, to offer counseling and training to people in that area. Your Cooperative Program gifts help to support these ministries.

The School of Nursing graduated its last class in May. The school has been in the process of phasing out for the past three years, as the result of a trustee decision made in 1971.

In January the hospital had its only room rate increase in the past three and one half years. Nevertheless, the hospital continues to operate "in the black." The 1973 Mother's Day Offerings amounted to \$375,000. At the time of this writing, our 1974 Mother's Day gifts are running ahead of the same time last year. These gifts are used to assist patients with most urgent financial needs. A special committee of five Baptists from the Winston-Salem area assists personnel from the hospital Business Office and the Department of Denominational Relations in administering these funds.

Your hospital staff, and the people they serve, are grateful for your interest, your prayers and your financial support.

AUDIO VISUAL AIDS

A. Film Library

During the past year, the department booked approximately 12,000 free rental films strips. We would say about 70 percent of the churches in the convention are using audiovisual aids regularly.

Among the films available are Workers Together With God and Call 337, a 30 minute film setting forth the role of the hospital chaplaincy in relation to hospital administration and patient need. 1974 ASSOCIATIONAL REPORT ANNUITY BOARD OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION

The Southern Baptist Convention Annuity Board paid out a record nearly \$16 million in retirement and protection benefits during 1973. This means that in the Board's history, it has paid out over \$100 million in retirement and protection benefits.

More than 9.000 retired pastors and other church-related vocational workers or their widows receive the benefits.

In addition, the Annuity Board set another record. This one was for funds held in trust for those participating in retirement and protection plans while still in active service. About 38,000 pastors, other church staff and denominational agency employes are included.

Funds held in trust exceeded \$350 million for the first time,

President Darold H. Morgan reported.

The Board issued another 13th Check, or extra benefit, for annuitants shortly before Christmas 1973. It amounted to two extra months' worth of benefits and totaled \$1,187,379. The 13th Check helps annuitants, whose benefits are fixed, to meet the rising cost of living. Payment of the 13th Check is over and above the 12 contracted monthly benefits and depends from year to year on investment income.

Board officials and national market experts expected the investment picture to brighten in 1974 after a poor performance in the general stock market in 1973 resulted in a deep cut in income from investments. Investment income declined to \$10 million in 1973 after hitting a record of more than \$22 million the year before.

The Board's decline in equity, or stock, investments paralleled the decline in the market generally, which affected all other types of investors as well. The major market indicators — Dow-Jones, Strandard and poor, and Valve Line — all were

down during the year.

By comparison, the Board's investments in mortgage loans and real estate leasebacks proved to be profit-making for the year. In an effort to continue earning from real estate investments, the Board announced a new type of Plan C investment called land equity loans. Plan C is the Board's variable benefit plan, which supplements the basic retirement program, called Plan A, for minister.

New Hope Baptist Church

NEW HOPE BAPTIST CHURCH HISTORY

New Hope Baptist Church has a long and colorful history. The first known meeting place of the early settlers in this neighborhood was in a log school and church combination house on a site near the residence of where Claude Critcher now resides.

It was here that the late Daniel C. Jones, Allen Jones, and J. Calvin Jones decided to move down to the present site, and meet in a small temporary wooden structure. During the early

days Negro slaves and fellow neighbors met together.

In a meeting held on December 17, 1881, the three men mentioned above, with the assistance of Rev. T. M. Honeycutt, of Mars Hill, N. C., a Missionary from the Western Baptist Convention (now N. C. State Convention) established a Missionary Baptist Church, known as New Hope, the first Missionary Baptist Church organized in Alleghany County, and one of the three churches in Alleghany to form the Ashe-Alleghany Association in 1886 at Buffalo Church in Ashe County.

From a deed dated: On August 8, 1883, Daniel C. Jones and wife Caroline Jones; J. Calvin Jones and wife Mazie E.; Allen Jones and wife Nannie J.; "give and convey a certain tract or parcel of land for the purpose of building a Baptist Church house on the waters of Prathers Creek, containing 1 1/4 acres" — This deed was made to officials of New Hope Church and their successors.

"On December 17, 1881, the covenant of the Missionary Baptist Church: Prathers Creek, Alleghany County reads as fol-

lows:

(1st.) Having been called by the grace of God out of darkness into light, we do covenant and agree to watch over each other in love, and to tell each other of their faults — remind each of duties. And in all cases to pursue toward each other the course laid down by the Savior in the 18th Chapter of St. Matthew.

(2nd.) We agree to sustain an Evangelical ministry so far as

we have the ability.

(3rd.) We will not willingly neglect attending promptly our regular meetings.

(4th.) We believe in aiding the spread of the gospel throughout

the world.

(5th.) We agree to send representatives to the New River Association in Virginia.

In 1881, Rev. A. Stamy was the first minister: John H. Ellis was the first church clerk. Daniel C. Jones and Allen Jones were the first elected deacons to be regularly ordained.

On July 8, 1882, it was decided that New Hope Baptist Church send the following delegation to the New River Association in Grayson County, Virginia: Daniel C. Jones, J. Calvin Jones, Allen Jones and John H. Ellis. Morgan Upchurch was to be an alternate.

In August 1882, Rev. William M. Hall was called to be the

regular pastor.

From the beginning all neighboring Baptist Churches (Sparta, Liberty and others) were invited by special messengers from New Hope Church "to commune with us at our regular communion in August of each year."

In November 1883, Elder S. Blackburn was called as pastor. Allen Jones was elected church clerk, and served in this ca-

pacity until his death in 1924.

In 1884, the original wooden structure 36' x 40' with plain glass windows was constructed, completed in 1887, renovated in 1900 and 1922.

On June 12, 1884, New Hope Church elected the following delegates to the next session of the New River Association: H. E. McMillan, J. Calvin Jones, John H. Ellis and Allen Jones. It was in 1884 that New Hope Church decided to leave the New River Association.

In May 1886, Rev. T. M. Honeycutt came as pastor.

In August 1886, New Hope Church appointed H. E. McMillian, N. H. Jones, J. Calvin Jones, Daniel C. Jones and Alfred Moxley to represent the church in a convention for the purpose of organizing an Association. The Convention was held with Buffalo Church in Ashe County, September 24, 1886.

In 1887, the church was completed, and a committee was appointed to select a suitable cemetery: N. H. Jones, Allen Jones, Daniel C. Jones, Alfred Moxley and H. E. McMillian.

On August 13, 1887, the first delegates were appointed to attend the Ashe-Alleghany Association: N. H. Jones, H. E. Mc-Millian, Allen Jones, and Daniel C. Jones. The Ashe-Alleghany Baptist Association convened at New Hope Church from September 22-24, 1887. As stated in the records: "They had a grand and glorious session of four days meeting."

In October 1887, New Hope Baptist Church was first dedicated to God. Dedication sermon was by Rev. S. M. Collice.

In 1890, Rev. D. J. Harris became pastor, and J. Calvin

Jones was the first Sunday School Superintendent.

Other church pastors were: Rev. E. Blevins, Rev. A. J. Wagoner, Rev. T. M. Dunkin, Rev. James Shumate, Rev. F. B. Cheek, Rev. George Reeves, Rev. Landreth Blevins, Rev. Coy Blackburn, Rev. Andy Blevins, Rev. J. T. Fletcher, Rev. W. L. Hoppers, Rev. H. L. Cofey, Rev. L. L. Underwood, Rev. J. D. Whisnant, Rev. West, Rev. F. G. Walker, Rev. Howard J. Ford, Rev. G. A. Martin, Rev. C. H. McKnight, Rev. Snyder, Rev. W. H. Caldwell, Rev. Bill Pruitt, and Rev. Hayes McClure, present pastor.

Church Clerks were: John H. Ellis, 1881-1883; Allen Jones, 1883-1924 (to death); Rufus Jones, 1924-1935; Dan J. Jones,

1935-1959 (to death); and Walter Jones, 1959--.

Mrs. B. F. Wagoner has been a member longer than anyone now living, having joined New Hope Church in 1895. Mrs.

Pearl Cox, 60 years, and Dr. Edgar Jones, 57 years.

Additional land was given by Dan J. Jones and wife Maggie Jones and the present structure was begun in April 1959, at a cost of \$11,473.48 actual cash and many hours free labor and materials. Yet to complete are the steeple, landscaping, additional Sunday School rooms in the basement and the water works.

CHURCH ACHIEVEMENT 1973-74

It is predicted that Baptists of western North Carolina have their brightest days ahead. After all the turmoil and strife that have been witnessed in our nation in the last while, this is a heartening thought. The prediction will not come true on its own but by us using the theme of the Association, "Sharing His Love Now." Are we as Christians doing our duty? The love of God is the most important thing in the world. It is up to us that love of every opportunity offered to increase the effectiveness of our witness all about us. Let's meet the challenge!

All the churches of the Association have been witnesses of God's love in the work they have done in the past Associational year:

Belview: Work has been done on a vestibule, the center aisle and pulpit have been carpeted, a special aid for telling Bible stories to the children has been purchased. Plans are being made to add two Sunday-School rooms. A Bible Study was held in March.

Chestnut Grove: Church improvements were made by paneling the sanctuary walls, lowering the ceiling, installation of new light fixtures and additions of storm windows.

Laurel Springs: The extension to the church was completed, the fellowship room and steps to basement were carpeted, kitchen fixtures installed, water supplied from new well on church grounds, drapes for windows in fellowship hall, grading done on church grounds. All woodwork on outside of building repainted. The January Bible Study was held in March. The church also sponsored a child to attend the Special Opportunities Camp.

Liberty: Church services changed from one-half to three-fourth time, paid all indebtedness, hostess to Associational singing, January Bible Study, observed study courses for Home and Foreign Missions with all churches in Association invited. Attendance very good. A midweek prayer meeting is conducted by laymen, and the Recorder has been added to church budget.

Mt. Carmel: Reports a good year by paying off indebtedness on the new Sunday School rooms, painted the outside of the church, made improvements on church grounds, had a wonderful revival and Vacation Bible School. The clerk stated, "The Lord has blessed us real good."

New Hope: Purchased six tables and thirty chairs for the basement, a lawn mower for church grounds and cemetery, put lime and fertilizer on church grounds and held Vacation Bible School with study course for all.

New River: Reported that they had a good year.

Osborne Memorial: A memorial was given to the church by the family, in memory of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Osborne. This was Altar Paraments and a picture. Contributions were made to all North Carolina State Baptist Agencies. A Vacation Bible School and Bible Study was held. The church sponsored a child to attend the Special Opportunities 4-H Camp.

Pine Fork: Cleared land around the church, built baptising pool, Lord's Supper set donated by Mr. and Mrs. Del Orr, land donated to church by Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Williams, land scraped to improve church grounds and grass planted. New restrooms were built.

Scottville: Built front porch to church, installed bathrooms, built reservoir, painted Sunday School rooms and put up doors to each. A larger parking area was made and several loads of gravel was put on it.

Sparta: Work was done on the parsonage. The carport was made into a sunroom and a double carport was added to the structure. A new drive way from the Main Street to the parsonage. The church celebrated its 90th Anniversary on Sunday, August 25th. A history of the church's 90 years was compiled by Rev. Sepaugh and other church members. Each family present was presented a copy of the history.

My sincere appreciation to all the church clerks of the Association for this help in making this report.

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE: We, the messengers of Baptist Churches in the County of Alleghany, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

Article 1. The name of this organization shall be Alleghany Baptist Association.

MEMBERSHIP

Article 2. The members of this Association shall consist of all pastors serving constituent churches together with all churches and such messengers as may be selected by the churches comprising it and duly certified to in the annual letters sent by the churches to the appointed meetings, the basis of representation being three messengers for each church having a membership not exceeding fifty and one additional messenger for each increase of fifty, or fraction thereto: Provided that no church have more than five messengers from its lay membership.

OBJECTS

Article 3. The object of this body shall be to devise and recommend measures for increasing the unity and growth, the intelligence and spiritual powers of the churches, and for the developing and directing their energies, their resources and their gifts, in promoting the Kingdom of God on the earth in compliance with the New Testament principles and in cooperation with the State Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

POWERS AND PEROGATIVES

Article 4. While disclaiming the right of authority to interfere in the affairs of any local church, this Association asserts its privilege of using its discretion in receiving churches into its fellowship, and in withdrawing fellowship from any church found on careful investigation to be walking in disorder or failing in practice to endorse and support the missionary and benevolent work of the Baptist denomination.

Article 5. The Association shall meet annually, the time and place being determined at the previous session; and each

annual assembly shall organize itself by properly enrolling its membership, and by electing from its membership, at the regular appointed time, the following officers: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational W.M.U. President, Choir Director, and Pianist. The newly elected officers shall assume the duties of their office at the close of the session at which they are elected. The Moderator and Clerk shall arrange an order of the business and program for each session, subject to change if the Association so desires.

Article 6. At each annual session an Executive Committee shall be appointed by the Association, which Committee shall consist of the general officers of the body together with the pastor of each church, and 1 member, which member shall be nominated by the church or by delegates present from the church and approved by the Association. This Committee shall meet as often as it may desire for the effectual execution and performance of its duties. At its discretion it may select out of its own membership a smaller Committee of not less than five members to act in its behalf between sessions of the full Board.

Article 7. At each annual session there shall be appointed a committee to make report at the subsequent session on the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Christian Education, Baptist Orphanage, Hospital, Periodicals, Sunday Schools, Training Unions, Woman's Missionary Union, Temperance and Public Morals.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 8. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meeting punctually at the appointed time, to enforce the rules, to decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Association, and appoint all committees unless otherwise ordered.

Article 9. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence.

Article 10. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the Association, to superintend the printing and distribution of the same; and

to keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the body.

Article 11. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed direct to the Association by the churches and make an annual report to the Association.

Article 12. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to examine annually the Treasurer's books and attest the report.

Article 13. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts and interest about each of the churches of the Association and make a report at each session of this body.

Article 14. It shall be the duty of the Associational Sunday School Superintendent to promote the work of the Sunday School in the Association.

Article 15. It shall be the duty of the Associational Training Union Director to promote the work of the Training Union in the Association.

Article 16. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to transact the business of the Association ad interim as specified in Article Three. It shall contract no debts in the name of the Association without its specific authority. It shall make annual reports of the Association of the general state of missions and the work done.

Article 17. This constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

(Reprint from "The Minutes of a Convention organizing the Ashe and Alleghany Association held at Buffalo Church in Ashe County, September 24, 25, 1886)

1st. We believe in one only true and living God; and that there are three persons in the God-head -- the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, and these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible -- the Old and New Testament -- is the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

3rd. We believe in the impotency of man, and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper

are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator; and that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and in doctrine, should take the Lord's supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the Saints

in Grace to Glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a

General Judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

RULES OF ORDER

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. A majority of members present shall be a quorum for the transaction of business, except in matters relating to the constitution.

3. Brethren invited to seats with us shall have the

privilege of discussion but not of voting.

4. No question shall be discussed without a motion and second. All motions made and seconded shall be definitely stated by the Moderator, or at his request, be read by the Clerk before vote is called for. If a motion contains two or more points it shall be divided, by request of one member, and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote.

5. Members wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator and be recognized by him. He shall confine himself to the question under consideration, and avoid all personalities. He shall not speak more than twice on the same subject and not over fifteen minutes without permission from the body.

- 6. When a question is under discussion no other motion of proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they come.
- 7. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted for consideration.
- 8. Any church failing to be represented in this body either by messengers or by letter for two sessions will be subject to the discipline of the body. A committee will be appointed to visit the church and aid them in any way possible and in case the church shall not report for the third year it shall be excluded from the fellowship of the Association.
- 9. No member shall absent himself permanently from the session of the Association without the permission of the Moderator.
- 10. All questions of order not herein provided for in these Rules of Order shall be decided by Rules or some recognized "Parliamentary Practice," preferably Robert's or Kerfoots.



CONSTITUTION

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION ALLEGHANY ASSOCIATION

PREAMBLE

We, the women of the Baptist Churches of Alleghany Association, desirous of stimulating the missionary spirit and grace of giving among the women and young people of the churches, and of aiding in the collection of funds for missionary purposes to be distributed by the State and Southern Woman's Missionary Union, the General Board of the State, and Southern Baptist Convention adopt the following constitution:

ARTICLE I

Name

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Missionary Union of Alleghany Association, auxiliary to the Alleghany Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II Object

The object of this organization shall be three-fold:

(1) To stimulate a broader Christian development on the part of the women and young people of the Association, to train and enlist all in Christian service, especially soul winning.

(2) To receive and distribute missionary information, to provide missionary organization among women, young

people and children.

(3) To encourage the earnest cooperation of women and young people and junior organizations in systematic contribution of time and money, at home and abroad.

ARTICLE III Membership

The membership of the Union shall be composed of Missionary Societies and Young Woman's Auxiliaries, connected with the churches in Alleghany Association.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The officers shall be a Superintendent, an assistant Superintendent, a Young People's Leader, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and Pianist. (Secretary-Treasurer may be held as one office. Pianist is optional.)

Section 2. There shall be six chairmen of Departmental Work; Mission Study, Community Missions, Stewardship, Margaret Fund, Training School, and Literature.

Section 3. The Executive Committee shall be composed

of the officers, and the chairman of Departmental work.

Election

Section 4. These officers shall be elected by the body at the annual meeting; preferably after being named by nominating committee that has been selected by the Executive Committee at least a month prior to the annual meeting. This committee should meet as soon as possible, and as many times as necessary to complete list of officers before annual meeting, and report to annual meeting.

ARTICLE V Associational Meeting

The Associational meeting shall be held annually or at such time and place as the Union decides. It shall be opened and closed with religious exercises, present missionary program, transact business, and hear reports of officers and committees of the organization.

ARTICLE VI

The program shall be arranged by the Superintendent of the Association with the aid of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VII

This constitution may be altered or amended by a twothirds vote of the members present at the annual meeting, provided said amendment has been submitted in writing, signed by at least two members, to the Superintendent two months prior to the action thereon.

BY-LAWS

A. Duties of Officers

1. Superintendent - The Superintendent shall preside at the Associational and Executive Committee meetings; shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for; shall cooperate with local committee in arranging for annual meeting; shall advance in every way possible the work of the Association; and shall be a general supervisor of all the work of the Associational Union. She shall keep in touch with the Societies by visiting, correspondence, and by sending literature; shall endeavor with the aid of her associates, to organize a W.M.S., Y.W.A., G.A., Sunbeam Band and Chapter of R.A.'s in every church of the Association. She shall send quarterly and annual reports to the State Executive Committee and Divisional Superintendent, and prepare a comprehensive report of the year's work for the annual meeting. She should attend, if possible, the Divisional Meetings and State W.M.U. Conventions and Associa-

tional Conference held at this time. She should also attend the General Alleghany Baptist Association and feel responsible that a report of W.M.U. is given and recorded in the minutes. She shall also endeavor to keep her associational work in line with the State and Southern W.M.U.

2. Assistant Superintendent. The assistance Superintendent shall preside at Associational and Executive Meetings in the absence or disability of the Superintendent, and assist in advancing all the work of the Associational Union.

3. Young People's Leader - The Young People's Leader shall have general oversight of the Junior organizations, striving to organize a Y.W.A., a R.A., a G.A. and Sunbeam Band in each church of the association, visiting and helping foster in every way said organizations. She shall submit quarterly and annual reports to the Superintendent and to the State Young People's Secretary. She shall have charge of the Young People's Hour at the Associational meeting.

4. Secretary - It will be the duty of the secretary to keep an accurate record of annual and Executive Committee Meetings; and notify committees of their appointment and perform any other duties generally imposed on this officer.

5. Treasurer - The treasurer shall keep an accurate account of all money passing through her hands and shall make a report of same to the Associational Union.

- 6. Mission Study Chairman The Mission Study Chairman shall promote Mission Study in various churches of the Associations, endeavoring to reach the Societies through their Mission Study Chairman. She shall receive reports of the number of classes held, enrollment, and number of awards given in each organization submitting her report at the Associational Meeting. She shall also make reports to Divisional Chairmen of Mission Study, and to the State Chairman.
- 7. Stewardship Chairman It shall be the duty of the Stewardship Chairman to promote the teaching of stewardship in its fullest sense in the Missionary Societies of all grades in the Association following the plan outlined by our State and Southwide W.M.U. Stewardship Chairman. Reports should be made quarterly and annually to Division and State Chairman.
- 8. Community Missions The Community Missions Chairman shall urge cooperation with the Community Missions plans of the State and Southern Community Missions Chairman in organizing and directing the community mis-

sions work, in an effort to reach the oppressed and unsaved. She shall present this by talk, playlet, or conference whenever possible, and make an annual report at the Associational Meeting and send reports to Divisional and State Chairmen.

- 9. Margaret Fund Chairman It shall be the duty of the Margaret Fund Chairman to encourage the societies to give through the Annie W. Armstrong offering in March and to the Lottie Moon Christmas offering in December, to provide scholarships for missionary children's education in the homeland. She should keep in touch with the State Margaret Fund Chairman and cooperate in every possible way she suggests. She shall receive the Burney Gift from the Societies at the annual Associational Meeting and forward same to state headquarters.
- 10. Training School Chairman Training School Chairman can stress various ways in supporting this most worthy institution. She should urge liberal offering to the Heck Memorial offering and encourage programs on this cause.
- 11. Literature Chairman The Literature Chairman should urge subscribers to various Baptist papers and magazines and encourage reading more widely. She should take subscriptions for their periodicals at the annual meeting.
- 12. Executive Committee. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to carry out plans of W.M.U. W. and to transact all business between sessions of W.M.U. It shall meet at least annually and as many additional times as the Superintendent of the Association shall deem necessary. Five members shall constitute a quorum. When a vacancy occurs the Executive Committee shall be empowered to fill such vacancy for the remainder of the time unexpired. This committee shall name a month prior to Annual meeting a committee of three to nominate officers at Annual Meeting.

B. Associational Expenses

The expenses of Associational work shall be provided for by an annual contribution of not more than fifty cents per member from each society, same to be known as Associational Progress Fund.

C. Committees

The Superintendent shall appoint Committees on Time and Place and Resolutions. All of these committees shall be composed of three members each, and shall report during the session.





Mrs. Betty Roupe moved for the adoption of the American Bible Society Report as seen in booklet of reports. It was sec-

onded by Floyd Roupe.

Mrs. Claude Roupe moved for the adoption of the Dept. of Communications Report. She encouraged all churches to take advantage of the facilities we have available. The report was seconded by Dell Orr, voted on, and carried.

A motion was made by Bob Dolinger, and seconded by Rev. Michael Sepaugh to add the Stewardship and Cooperative Program Report prepared by Tom Greene to the book of reports,

and later be added to the Associational Annual.

Mrs. T. S. Moxley moved for the adoption of the Auditor's Report, prepared by J. K. Blum as seen in the booklet of reports. It was seconded by Dell Orr, voted on, and carried.

At this time Mr. Roupe expressed our gratitude and apprecia-

tion for our speakers from our agencies.

The Scholarship Fund was brought before the congregation to be studied and brought back before the Association in the Afternoon Session.

Mrs. Wilma Foster led the congregation in singing the hymn, "Battle Hymn of the Republic." She stated this song was selected due to our Bi-Centennial and that we should be aware that He is our Lord.

In the absence of Rev. Ralph Smith, Rev. Hayes McClure pastor of Osborne Memorial Baptist Church came to us to bring the morning message from I Corinthians 9:13-23. He

asked if we are being selfish with all our freedom that we have been blessed with and are we sharing it on a basis that God would like? Mr. Roupe, in the absence of the Resolutions Committee Chairman, expressed the feeling and thanks of the group in behalf of all the churches to the First Baptist Church, Sparta.

Dr. Perry Crouch was to receive a copy of the Resolution of Appreciation concerning himself.

The Moderator asked for miscellaneous business.

Rev. Michael Sepaugh brought the recommendation of the Scholarship Fund before the Association and made motion we adopt this report and put it into action as soon as the money is available. It was seconded by Mrs. Wilma Foster. Any suggestions concerning the fund should be passed on to the committee.

A motion was made by Rev. Michael Sepaugh and seconded by Jimmy Nichols to adopt the Resolution as seen in the book

of reports. It was voted on and carried.

Jimmy Nichols reported for the Time, Place, and Preacher Committee and reported next year's Association will be held September 10 and 11, 1976 at Mt. Carmel Baptist Church, Rev. Jimmy Warden to be the preacher; Rev. George Farmer, Alternate.

Kenneth R. Mullins had asked Rev. Michael Sepaugh to be coordinator of our county for the W.N.C. Home for the Aged building project. Rev. Sepaugh offered to share this with H. C. Rector of the Association's Committee on Denominational

Agencies.

As information for the Association, Rev. Sepaugh made an announcement concerning the Baptist State Convention of N. C. selecting a new general secretary - treasurer to succeed retiring W. Perry Crouch at the annual convention in November in Asheville, and urged the association to pray for God's will in this selection process.

As information to the association, he also announced that plans will be made soon for the Alleghany Seminary Extension Center to have a class during the new Associational year.

Rev. George Farmer will coordinate the planning in our association for the County-wide Bi-Centennial worship service which will be held the last Sunday night in June.

Mrs. Foster led the congregation in singing "Amazing

Grace" with Mrs. F. A. Wagner at the piano.

Rev. George Farmer brought the afternoon sermon, taking his text from Isaiah 50:4-6 and 53:5, Subject: "Thinking of Christ."

Memorial Service was given by Mrs. Wilma Foster.

The congregation sang a hymn "Take the Name of Jesus with You."

Mr. Roupe expressed the joy in having Mrs. Alice Caudill present in our Association and the sorrow that her sister, Mrs. Anice Wagoner was in the hospital at this time.

The moderator adjourned the Annual Meeting of the Alleghany Baptist Association. Jimmy Nichols led in prayer in adjourning.

CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION REPORT

Colleges Active in Mission Support

Baptist colleges in North Carolina see themselves as active participants in the Christian mission to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ with all people everywhere. In addition to the important role of preparing future lay leaders for local churches, the colleges continue a strong emphasis upon ministerial and church-related vocational training.

In April of 1975, our seven colleges reported a total of 715 persons who were preparing for careers in church leadership. Most of these persons will complete their preparation by at-

tending a seminary. Southern Baptist seminaries listed an enrollment of 303 graduates of North Carolina Baptist colleges in the spring of 1975. The Foreign Mission Board has under appointment 152 of our graduates at present, more than 6% of the total number of current missionary personnel. In addition, a significant number of Baptist college trained persons serve in strategic posts with the Home Mission Board, Baptist State conventions and associational missions throughout the Southern Baptist Convention. Baptist college students receive excellent experience and training for church and missionary service through Baptist Youth Crops. Approximately 100 Baptist college students were assigned to churches for the summer of 1975. The colleges furnish one-half of the Youth Corps worker's salary, and thus enjoy a vital partnership with churches and students in summer mission work.

Cooperative Program Vital to Colleges

With the exception of what students pay, the cooperative program continues to be the largest single source of annual income for our colleges. In these days of financial uncertainty, the colleges are grateful for the level of support which North Carolina Baptists have maintained. During 1975, the anticipated Cooperative Program budget for the colleges will provide: Campbell College, \$416,066; Chowan College, \$263,333; Gardner-Webb College, \$329,166; Mars Hill College, \$360,776; Meredith College, \$360,776; Wake Forest University, \$639,900; and Wingate College, \$263,333.

It is accurate to say that the ministry of North Carolina Baptist colleges, as we know it today, is the direct result of Cooperative Program support.

Baptist College Day

Another way the churches help to relieve the colleges' financial burden is through the annual offering on Father's Day. Designated for student aid, this offering gives much-needed assistance to many students from Baptist churches, making an education on a Christian college campus possible.

The Need to Enroll Baptist Students

Pastors and other church leaders can assist their young people and our colleges by encouraging attendance at a Baptist college. Information is available in brochure form, free of charge, from the Council on Christian Higher Education of the Baptist State Convention in Raleigh. Each of the colleges pledges to North Carolina Baptist young people that no qualified student will be turned away for purely financial reasons. Through grants, loans and work scholarships, an educa-

tion is available for anyone who seriously seeks it.

A Pledge and A Plea

North Carolina Baptist colleges are committed to Christian values, and to an active partnership with their fellow-Baptists in evangelism, missions, education and social concern.

Your Baptist colleges sincerely solicit the supportive prayers of North Carolina Baptist churches, that we will be aware of and receptive to Divine guidance in performing the work which we have been given to do.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

The Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, Inc. is a multiple service agency of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina offering children and families in crisis a variety of services. These services are as follows: group living on six campuses, care for children in need of specialized assistance, foster homes, social work services with and without financial assistance, continuing education for college, services to families, technical training and other types of higher education, and a demonstration program of preschool child care and development. For administrative purposes the state is divided into three areas. The western area has Hugh Starnes as area administrator, the piedmont area has J. Parker McLendon as area administrator with the Alleghany Association considered a part of the Piedmont area, and Roger E. Williams, Jr. is Eastern area administrator.

In 1974 the 16mm motion picture "The Mountain Within" was released about the ministries of the Children's Homes and is now available for showing in the churches. A new aspect of ministry was begun in 1974 with the opening of an emergency care home in Burlington. Other homes have been opened since that time to care for children in a crises until they can proceed for care on one of the regular campuses. The little newspaper, Charity and Children, continues to be the voice of Baptist child care. Each church should make it available to members so they can be informed regularly about the modern day child care provided by the Baptist Children's Homes. This care is truly a Christian Mission Ministry.

We are also glad that several speakers from the Children's Homes could participate in the services of most churches of the Association in June. The first hand reports about their agency and cooperative Baptist efforts were a blessing to all.

1975 BIBLICAL RECORDER REPORT

Baptist state papers claimed more attention than usual at the 1975 meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in Miami Beach this year. In the celebration of the 50th Anniversary of the Cooperative Program, it was revealed that they had played a tremendous part in the growth of our denomination. Louie D. Newton, denominational statesman and former editor of Georgia's Christian Index, introduced all the 33 editors of state papers and made a comparison of circulation of each in 1975 with that of 1925 when the Cooperative Program was born. Many were not in existence at that time, however, but this in itself reveals something of Southern Baptist growth.

In giving a special committee report on state papers, H. Franklin Paschall, pastor of First Church, Nashville, Tenn., reported that present circulation is 1 3/4 million and recommended that the convention reaffirm its goal of getting a state paper into two million Baptist homes by 1980. The committee recommended a vigorous campaign in all states to help accomplish this, and also recommended that state papers be

incorporated in all local church budgets.

The BIBLICAL RECORDER is one of those 33 state papers, and one of the oldest, and we hope, one of the best. In spite of continued problems for religious publications because of inflation, and sky-rocketting postage costs, the circulation of the RECORDER remains above 112,000. Congregations including it in their budgets for all their families are the ones which have an informed membership. It is our hope that North Carolina Churches will take seriously the recommendation reaffirmed at the Southern Baptist Convention that state papers be incorporated in local church budgets for all their member families. Already more than 1,000 churches in North Carolina are doing this, and more congregations do so each year. Pastors and deacons should initiate such action, and it should be supported by all the organizations in the church.

The BIBLICAL RECORDER has covered many sensitive issues this past year. Words of appreciation have come from Baptist people all across the state, for they are aware that "an informed people is the bulwark of Baptist democracy."

The RECORDER continues to operate on a limited budget, and with an altogether too small staff. Local churches can help us

by understanding these limitations, and by renewing their sub-

scription plans promptly.

Ray K. Hodge, pastor of First Church, Kinston, says: "One of the easiest tasks I have had as a pastor is to lead churches to include and keep the denominational paper in the church budget. It is such a bargan that trying to save a few dollars (by not subscribing to it for our families) is too costly. It would be like saving the expense of regular visits to the dentist, only to pay more in various ways later."

His advice is well taken.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FLETCHER BAPTIST COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

Known as the Department of Communications prior to the completion of the new library and studio facilities, this department has been named in honor of Mr. A. J. Fletcher, prominent Baptist layman of Raleigh, who provided a challenge gift of \$50,000 for the equipping of the new studio facilities for full radio and television production.

The Center promotes the total Baptist program through the divisions of the General Board, its agencies and institutions. Program promotion is carried out through assistance to the departments of the General Board, to individual churches and

through radio and television productions.

During the past year, the Communications Center has booked more than 12,000 films and filmstrips to the various churches, camps and assemblies. These films are provided free rental and are part of a library of more than 2600 separate titles. The Center produces more than 100 radio programs each week providing stations all across the state. Radio programs include North Carolina Religious News Scope (55 stations), Light for Living (6 stations), Listen, America! (3 stations), Bible Story Time (3 stations), International Bible Lesson (9 stations).

Television programs produced include Light Unto My Path (in sign language for deaf on 21 stations in 10 states), Church of Our Fathers, Guide for Living, Light for Living, Bible Story Time and Listen America!

Produced in our own studio facilities are cable programs: Guide for Living and International Bible Lesson with numerous other productions being added to the central library for use by cablevision stations across the state.

The Center also produced a new state missions filmstrip,

Because We Care, which depicts the various areas of state mission ministries supported by North Carolina Baptists. A 3/4 inch videocasette program, Gateway to Ministry, was produced by the Center for use by the six Southern Baptist seminaries in giving their annual report to the Southern Baptist Convention meeting in Miami in June.

The Center provides audio-visual equipment for field staff members to use at the various conferences and retreats all year as well as providing equipment for the various summer camps and assemblies. We estimate more than 1,000 pieces

are booked each year through these facilities.

The Center would like to extend the warmest possible invitation to each and every Baptist in North Carolina to stop by our studios on the fourth floor of the Baptist Building to see what you have in production facilities. We know you are proud and grateful to God that North Carolina has the first fully equipped television center in the Southern Baptist Convention and each one of you helped to make this a reality! Please call or write to take advantage of this valuable tool in getting out the Word to those in darkness.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

There have been many significant developments, in several different areas, at your Baptist Hospital during the past year.

By the time this report is read the new ambulatory care unit will be open, making possible enlarged and improved services for the Emergency Room, Out-patient Clinics, Physical Therapy and other departments. Renovation of the West Wing will be complete and renovation on the South Wing will begin in early August. The third floor of the Progressive Care Unit has been remodeled to provide 26 beds, therapy room and other improved facilities for Psychiatric services.

The long-awaited EMI-scanner is now in use and is already proving beneficial in detecting blood clots, tumors, strokes

and other abnormalities of the brain.

The Family Practice Center opened July 1, 1975 to offer more primary medical care for patients and also to provide specialized training for physicians who choose to enter Family Practice.

During the year the hospital had its biennial review by the Joint Commission on Hospital Accreditation. All areas of op-

eration received an excellent report, but physician service, nursing service and administration all received especially high commendation.

Despite the continued rise in costs for services and materials the hospital has been able to operate in the black. The administration and department heads confer frequently and make diligent effort to see that the hospital operates as ef-

ficiently and economically as possible.

Gifts from the Baptist churches have been very gratifying. During the calendar year of 1974 the hospital received \$258,898 through the Cooperative Program and \$392,000 through the Mother Day Offering. Hospital staff members have participated in Cooperative Program promotion in cooperation with the State Convention Division of Stewardship and Cooperative Program Promotion.

The Department of Pastoral Care has opened a counseling center in Raleigh, its second satellite center. Plans are developing for a third satellite in the western part of the state. The Department has established a scholarship fund as a memorial to Dr. Richard K. Young, the department's first director, who died December 31. Full re-accreditation was given

the School of Pastoral Care in December by the Association of Clinical Pastoral Education.

During the past year Mr. Reid T. Holmes retired as President of the hospital, after serving in the hospital administration for 29 years.

The Cooperative Program celebrates its 50th Anniversary this year as the main channel of mission support from churches throughout the Southern Baptist Convention.

SCHOLARSHIP FUND FROM ALLEGHANY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

1. Amount of the scholarship shall be \$250.00 Request \$25.00 per church per year for the fund, churches that want to give more to the fund may do so.

2. Any unused funds would go toward scholarships of equal

value for the coming year.

- 3. Applications will be received only from students who plan to attend any one of the Baptist colleges supported by the Baptist State Convention of N. C. and who are members of any missionary Baptist church in the Alleghany Baptist Association, or whose parent (or parents) is a member of a missionary Baptist Church in the Alleghany Baptist Association.
- 4. The Executive Committee of the Association shall be empowered to receive applications, review them, and make the decision as to which applicant will receive the available scholarships.
 - A. If more than one person applies for a scholarship, the need of the student for financial assistance should be a primary factor in determining the one who will receive

the scholarship.

- B. Any time a student has already received this scholarship and applies for it a second time (or third or fourth time) and another student who has never received the scholarship also applies for same scholarship, the scholarship should be granted to the person who has not previously received assistance.
- C. No student shall be eligible to receive more than four scholarships from the Association, and not more than one scholarship per year.

D. A student must maintain a "C" average on his studies each year at least in order to apply for any successive scholarships.

1975 STEWARDSHIP AND COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

The faithful stewardship of individual Christians and the missionary vision of our churches, expressed through their support of the Cooperative Program enables Southern Baptists to maintain a growing World Missions Program at a time when many others are having to reduce their outreach.

The sun never sets on your offering through the Cooperative Program, and it goes to help evangelize, to teach, to heal, as well as preach the Good News of God around the world. Consider how your gifts are used in God's service. More than 5,000 missionaries at home and in over 80 nations abroad receive a salary each month from your Cooperative Program dollar. THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC. REPORT

As revealed through a Sunday School lesson during the past year, a good foundation of discipline and training in Spiritual matters is necessary for a young life to develop in a way to withstand the pressures of life during periods of stress and strain. It is almost trite to refer to the need of a good base or foundation for any activity or project contemplated in this life. Not in anyway is there a difference for a need of the foundation, as thought of in terms of the Baptist Foundation, when we consider the future potentialities and needs to sustain and expand mission efforts and services to bring mankind into the influence of the saving grace of God's Son, Jesus Christ.

Chartered in 1919 by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc. has sought to assist individuals throughout the state in their estate planning, providing ways to support Baptist institutions and mission work on a permanent basis. Property and funds placed with the Baptist Foundation are invested by a convention elected board of directors with the income paid annually to the institution or mission cause designated by the donor.

Individual assistance is provided Baptists throughout the state in the establishment of trusts that not only benefit the donor but also support the Christian ministries of our denomination in a lasting, perpetual way.

During the past two years, \$330,070.41 has been given to the N. C. Baptist Foundation, Inc., in the way of annuity trusts. In this type trust, the donors reserve the right to the income from the investments for their lifetime and then the income will be paid to the Baptist cause specified in the original trust agreement. The laws of our land provide to the donor certain tax advantages for the gift portion of these transactions.

Wills still account for a major portion of the funds held in trust by the foundation. One such gift to benefit mission work from this year forward, came in the form of a farm and other assets given by the deceased. It was determined by the tax records found in this estate, that this person will give annually three times as much for missions through the income from this trust fund, as she was ever able to earn in total wages during any year of her lifetime. So what she could not do for our Lord's work here on earth in her lifetime, she does after her life here among us has ended.

New gifts to be held in trust by the N. C. Baptist amounted to \$635,079.57 during 1974-75 fiscal year. Added to the market value of assets held from previous years brings the total value to \$2,331,559.67 as of June 30, 1975. Income from all assets held by the Foundation which have been or will be distributed to designated beneficiaries in the near future amounted to \$76,257.82 for the past 12 months.

During 1974, the Board paid about \$15-1/2 million in retirement and other protection benefits to these annuitants. In the Board's 57 years history, it has paid a total of over \$125 million in retirement and protection benefits.

The Annuity Board also holds in trust and invest retirement contributions from 38,000 pastors, other church staff and denominational employee — which will be converted into annuity

benefits when they retire.

These funds held in trust amount to a record \$353,445,743. While this seems a large amount of money, it needs to be noted that this must be divided by the number of future annuitants it will serve for the remainder of their lifetimes after retirement.

In December 1974, the Board issued a 13th Check to annuitants. It amounted to more than \$675,000 and was equal to one month's benefits. It is called a 13th Check because it is issued above and beyond the 12 regular monthly benefit checks distributed to annuitants.

In North Carolina 2134 churches and Associations and 2616 staff members are currently participating in the Southern

Baptist Protection Program.

In Alleghany Association as of June 30, 1975, 2 churches, Sparta First and Laurel Springs, are participating in the Southern Baptist Retirement Protection Program.

REPORT OF THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Due to the world's population reaching an estimated four billion people in 1974, most of these without ready access to the Word of God, the churches and Bible Societies were faced with a challenge to provide Scriptures in whatever languages and varieties that are required.

The "Good News for New Readers" launched in September, 1973 to provide Scripture Selections on graded levels for people just learning to read, has to date reached people in 70

countries in more than 100 languages.

In addition to supplying the Southern Baptists 12 Special Scripture editions, the American Bible Society aided the United Bible Society in supplying 252,956,174 Scriptures throughout the world. The subsidy required to do this was \$11,000,000 from the United Bible Societies World Budget, half of this underwritten by the American Bible Soc.

The American Bible Society maintains a strong program in countries where the Southern Baptist Convention has missionary activities plus a strong circulation, 810,000 Scriptures,

in Eastern European Countries.

The American Bible Society gives thanks to the Southern Baptist Convention for support and close cooperation, and with the challenge of hundreds of millions of people hungry for God's word, the Society requests support at the 1974 level — or more — plus additional funds for the Good News for New Readers Program.







SPARTA FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH HISTORY

By Mrs. A. O. Joines, Historian

Ninety-one years ago Sparta Baptist Church was organized on August 30, 1884. It was the third Baptist Church organized in Alleghany County. Mount Carmel Church having been organized just one week earlier. New Hope had the distinction of being the first.

Sparta Baptist Church was constituted by Revs. S. M. Collis, T. M. Duncan, and William M. Hall in the courthouse which was then located where Dart Dept. Store is now. There were five members in the organizational meeting: W. C. Fields, Rev. Wm. M. Hall, N. E. Hall, Drucilla Turner and Edna Hall. They adopted the covenant and articles of faith of the Baptist Church.

As recorded in the first clerk's book (which was recently located) the Rev. Wm. Hall was the first pastor and R. A. Turner the first clerk. In 1886 Rev. Honeycutt was chosen pastor and W. C. Fields, church clerk. The church was fortunate to secure Rev. Honeycutt in its infancy. He was an educated and

cultured man from Mars Hill who was affiliated with the Western North Carolina Convention,

Doubtless there was no church in the nineteenth century which had a record to equal the Sparta Baptist Church, for two lots were purchased for the church two years before the church was organized. Attny. W. C. (Bill) Fields is given credit for the foresightedness in negotiating the real estate from Joseph Johnson. The deed was made to W. C. Fields and two other men which reads: "Made to parties named above in trust to hold for the use and benefit of the Missionary Baptist Church, and as soon as church title here-in conveyed is to vest in the clerk of such church and his successors in office, a certain parcel of land in the town of Sparta on Main Street."

A frame church house was built in 1886. It was replaced in 1927 with brick building with Sunday School rooms, a baptisery, and equipped with a furnace. This was destroyed by fire in January, 1940.

Then the church purchased additional lots from Nannie Jones, R. L. Doughton, and J. M. Cheek, and relocated the church farther South on Main Street. A much larger brick building was erected to meet the growing need of the church and town in 1941. It was dedicated in 1948.

Around 1957 the church's growth necessitated expansion and the educational building was begun. This was equipped with electric heat and consisted of kitchen and fellowship hall.

The church was at a low ebb from 1913 to 1921 when no services were held and the local membership decreased to four. A revival started renewed interest. The revivalist was quoted as saying that at one of the services that 100 per cent membership was present, "Uncle" John I. Joines and wife and another couple were that faithful four members.

In 1921 through the influence of Dr. and Mrs. C. A. Reeves, Prof. John M. Cheek and the Executive Board of the Alleghany Association, an evangelist was secured from the State Board of Missions. The Rev. Herman T. Stevens conducted a two weeks revival. At the close of the meeting the church door was opened for the reception of members and the rehabilitation of Sparta Baptist Church. Thirteen joined the church and Rev. S. L. Belvins was elected pastor. The growth has been continuous since. Rev. Stevens held another revival in a tent in 1923 when 31 joined the church by experience or letters. This was the greatest revival in the history of the church. Rev. J. L. Underwood and Dr. G. A. Martin and other pastors have conducted revivals which have constantly added to the church membership.

The pews and pulpit furniture of the sanctuary were purchased in 1946 when Rev. F. G. Walker was pastor. The Hammond electric organ was secured in 1948 for \$2,500. Improvement of the church grounds were made in 1949 and shrubbery was planted. A new pastorium was built next to the church and was dedicated in 1948. Parking ground between the church and Jones Street was leveled in 1957 and paved in 1969. The old bulletin board was replaced by a brick one in 1963 soon after Rev. Lewis Williams became pastor. So far as can be ascertained in the early associational minutes, Sunday School was started in the "gay nineties". The training union had its beginning in the twenties by Kemp M. Estep. It was revived in the late thirties by Rev. Howard J. Ford, the pastor. The Woman's Missionary Union was sponsored by Mrs. N. C. Teague about 1926 while her husband was pastor in the Association. The Brotherhood was organized in 1954 while Rev. Jack W. Byrd was pastor. All these organizations continue to inform, train and inspire the membership more efficient service for our Lord and Savior.

Sparta Baptist Church has been served by the following pastors:

Underwood, G. A. Martin, Howard J. Ford, V. M. Sears, Richard L. West, F. Guy Walker, Jack W. Byrd, Lewis W. Williams, Austol Youmans Sr., and Michael Sepaugh.

Clerks have been R. A. Turner, W. C. "Bill" Fields, R. F. Gentry, E. A. Womble, Odell Edwards, T. Roy Burgiss, James Hoppers, Mrs. Ben G. Reeves, Herbert E. Singletary, Mrs. Betty Jo Andrews, Ralph Evans, and J. M. Sturgill.

HISTORICAL NOTES 1974-1975

"And ye shall know the truth and truth shall make you free. If the Son therefore shall make you free, ye shall be free indeed.

It is the knowledge of truth that creates freedom. The theme of the Associations being "Let Christ's Freedom Ring" is giving us the opportunity to bring to others the truth that shall set them free from the bondage of sin. May each member of each church resolve to let Christ guide his every walk in life.

Historical notes from the churches for 1974-75 are as fol-

lows:

Belview: Improvements on the church include porch enclosure constructed, windows insulated, and the roof painted. Plans are made for major remodeling in the coming year, including two Sunday School rooms. A sizable amount of lumber has been donated for the project. A building committee has been appointed.

Chestnut Grove: The church indebtedness has been paid. New Hymnals have been purchased. Extensive repairs are being made on the heating system. Church services are conducted each Sunday. Youth meetings are held twice a month. Midweek prayer services and Bible Study are held. The Vaca-

tion Bible School was well attended.

Laurel Springs: Regular maintenance has been done on the church and grounds. Much of the indebtedness has been paid on the building program. January Bible Study was observed. A week-end revival was held in June. The church sponsored a child for the Special Opportunity Camp. Contributions have been made to the various causes of the Baptist State Convention.

Liberty: The driveway to the church has been resurfaced. Two mission study courses have been taught. A report on Africa was given by a lady who had lived in Africa for two years. A study of "Revelation" was held. Vacation Bible School and two week-end revivals with evangelistic efforts were conducted. A film "The Gospel Road" was shown to the public with a requested return showing soon. The church has been represented at every executive meeting.

Mount Carmel: The membership is grateful to the State Highway Department for the hard-surfaced road to the church. An Adult Bible study, Vacation Bible School, and Revival Services were successful. Plans are being made for a paved

parking area for the church.

New Hope: Group work has been done on the church

grounds. The work in the basement of the church has been completed. The Vacation Bible School was successful. Bible Study is held each week along with choir practice. The church sponsored a child for the Special Opportunity Camp.

Osborne Memorial: The church sanctuary has been painted. A small table for the sanctuary and a vacuum cleaner were purchased. Vacation Bible School and Bible Study were held during the year. The church sponsored two children for the Special Opportunity Camp. Contributions have been made to the various agencies of the Baptist State Convention. Plans are being made for church expansion at a later date.

New River: The church has added a steeple to the building and painted the church. The aisles of the church have been carpeted. A restroom has been constructed.

Pine Fork: A new church sign has been constructed. The church lawn has been improved. Radio Broadcasting equipment has been purchased.

Scottville: A roof has been added to the entrance. Outside steps to the basement have been constructed. A Vacation Bible School and Adult Bible Study were taught. A successful revival was conducted. Funds are being raised for pews and carpeting for the sanctuary.

Sparta, First: Regular maintenance has been done on the church and grounds. A Vacation Bible School and January Bible Study were taught. The different programs of the church have continued to progress. Revival services were conducted. A child was sponsored for the Special Opportunity Camp. Contributions were made to the different causes of the Baptist State Convention.

We have had a good year. Let's make next year better.

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE: We, the messengers of Baptist Churches in the County of Alleghany, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain theorder of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

Article 1. The name of this organization shall be Alleghany Baptist Association.

MEMBERSHIP

Article 2. The members of this Association shall consist of all pastors serving constituent churches together with all churches and such messengers as may be selected by the churches comprising it and duly certified to in the annual letters sent by the churches to the appointed meetings, the basis of representation being three messengers for each church having a membership not exceeding fifty and one additional messenger for each increase of fifty, or fraction thereto: Provided that no church have more than five messengers from its lay membership.

OBJECTS

Article 3. The object of this body shall be to devise and recommend measures for increasing the unity and growth, the intelligence and spiritual powers of the churches, and for the developing and directing their energies, their resources and their gifts, in promoting the Kingdom of God on the earth in compliance with the New Testament principles and in cooperation with the State Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

POWERS AND PEROGATIVES

Article 4. While disclaiming the right of authority to interfere in the affairs of any local church, this Association asserts its privilege of using its discretion in receiving churches into its fellowship, and in withdrawing fellowship from any church found on careful investigation to be walking in disorder or failing in practice to endorse and support the missionary and benevolent work of the Baptist denomination.

Article 5. The Association shall meet annually, the time and place being determined at the previous session; and each

annual assembly shall organize itself by properly enrolling its membership, and by electing from its membership, at the regular appointed time, the following officers: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Auditor, Historian, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Training Union Director, Associational W.M.U. President, Choir Director, and Pianist. The newly elected officers shall assume the duties of their office at the close of the session at which they are elected. The Moderator and Clerk shall arrange an order of the business and program for each session, subject to change if the Association so desires.

Article 6. At each annual session an Executive Committee shall be appointed by the Association, which Committee shall consist of the general officers of the body together with the pastor of each church, and 1 member, which member shall be nominated by the church or by delegates present from the church and approved by the Association. This Committee shall meet as often as it may desire for the effectual execution and performance of its duties. At its discretion it may select out of its own membership a smaller Committee of not less than five members to act in its behalf between sessions of the full Board.

Article 7. At each annual session there shall be appointed a committee to make report at the subsequent session on the following subjects: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Christian Education, Baptist Orphanage, Hospital, Periodicals, Sunday Schools, Training Unions, Woman's Missionary Union, Temperance and Public Morals.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Article 8. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meeting punctually at the appointed time, to enforce the rules, to decide all questions of order subject to an appeal to the Association, and appoint all committees unless otherwise ordered.

Article 9. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence.

Article 10. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the Association, to superintend the printing and distribution of the same; and

to keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the body.

Article 11. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and pay over to the proper parties all the money contributed direct to the Association by the churches and make an annual report to the Association.

Article 12. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to examine annually the Treasurer's books and attest the report.

Article 13. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect and put in some durable form all facts and interest about each of the churches of the Association and make a report at each session of this body.

Article 14. It shall be the duty of the Associational Sunday School Superintendent to promote the work of the Sunday School in the Association.

Article 15. It shall be the duty of the Associational Training Union Director to promote the work of the Training Union in the Association.

Article 16. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to transact the business of the Association ad interim as specified in Article Three. It shall contract no debts in the name of the Association without its specific authority. It shall make annual reports of the Association of the general state of missions and the work done.

Article 17. This constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual session.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES

(Reprint from "The Minutes of a Convention organizing the Ashe and Alleghany Association held at Buffalo Church in Ashe County, September 24, 25, 1886)

1st. We believe in one only true and living God; and that there are three persons in the God-head -- the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, and these three are one.

2nd. We believe that the Bible -- the Old and New Testament -- is the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

 $3\mbox{rd}.$ We believe in the impotency of man, and the sovereignty of God.

4th. We believe that salvation is by Grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

5th. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper

are ordinances instituted by Jesus Christ, to be practiced only by believers in their spiritual order.

6th. We believe that Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water by a qualified administrator; and that only those who are thus baptized and are in fellowship with the church in feeling and in doctrine, should take the Lord's supper.

7th. We believe in the final perseverance of the Saints

in Grace to Glory.

8th. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a

General Judgment.

9th. We believe that the existence of the righteous and of the wicked will both be of eternal duration and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will both be eternal.

RULES OF ORDER

- 1. This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A majority of members present shall be a quorum for the transaction of business, except in matters relating to the constitution.
- 3. Brethren invited to seats with us shall have the privilege of discussion but not of voting.
- 4. No question shall be discussed without a motion and second. All motions made and seconded shall be definitely stated by the Moderator, or at his request, be read by the Clerk before vote is called for. If a motion contains two or more points it shall be divided, by request of one member, and the vote taken separately. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing before being put to a vote.
- 5. Members wishing to speak shall rise and address the Moderator and be recognized by him. He shall confine himself to the question under consideration, and avoid all personalities. He shall not speak more than twice on the

same subject and not over fifteen minutes without permission from the body.

- 6. When a question is under discussion no other motion of proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they come.
- 7. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted for consideration.
- 8. Any church failing to be represented in this body either by messengers or by letter for two sessions will be subject to the discipline of the body. A committee will be appointed to visit the church and aid them in any way possible and in case the church shall not report for the third year it shall be excluded from the fellowship of the Association.
- 9. No member shall absent himself permanently from the session of the Association without the permission of the Moderator.
- 10. All questions of order not herein provided for in these Rules of Order shall be decided by Rules or some recognized "Parliamentary Practice," preferably Robert's or Kerfoots.



CONSTITUTION

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION ALLEGHANY ASSOCIATION

PREAMBLE.

We, the women of the Baptist Churches of Alleghany Association, desirous of stimulating the missionary spirit and grace of giving among the women and young people of the churches, and of aiding in the collection of funds for missionary purposes to be distributed by the State and Southern Woman's Missionary Union, the General Board of the State, and Southern Baptist Convention adopt the following constitution:

ARTICLE I

Name

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Missionary Union of Alleghany Association, auxiliary to the Alleghany Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II Object

The object of this organization shall be three-fold:

- (1) To stimulate a broader Christian development on the part of the women and young people of the Association, to train and enlist all in Christian service, especially soul winning.
- (2) To receive and distribute missionary information, to provide missionary organization among women, young people and children.
- (3) To encourage the earnest cooperation of women and young people and junior organizations in systematic contribution of time and money, at home and abroad.

ARTICLE III Membership

The membership of the Union shall be composed of Missionary Societies and Young Woman's Auxiliaries, connected with the churches in Alleghany Association.

ARTICLE IV Officers

Section 1. The officers shall be a Superintendent, an assistant Superintendent, a Young People's Leader, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and Pianist. (Secretary-Treasurer may be held as one office. Pianist is optional.)

Section 2. There shall be six chairmen of Departmental Work; Mission Study, Community Missions, Stewardship, Margaret Fund, Training School, and Literature.

Section 3. The Executive Committee shall be composed

of the officers, and the chairman of Departmental work.

Flection

Section 4. These officers shall be elected by the body at the annual meeting; preferably after being named by nominating committee that has been selected by the Executive Committee at least a month prior to the annual meeting. This committee should meet as soon as possible, and as many times as necessary to complete list of officers before annual meeting, and report to annual meeting.

ARTICLE V Associational Meeting

The Associational meeting shall be held annually or at such time and place as the Union decides. It shall be opened and closed with religious exercises, present missionary program, transact business, and hear reports of officers and committees of the organization.

ARTICLE VI

The program shall be arranged by the Superintendent of the Association with the aid of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VII

This constitution may be altered or amended by a twothirds vote of the members present at the annual meeting, provided said amendment has been submitted in writing, signed by at least two members, to the Superintendent two months prior to the action thereon.

BY-LAWS A. Duties of Officers

1. Superintendent - The Superintendent shall preside at the Associational and Executive Committee meetings; shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for; shall cooperate with local committee in arranging for annual meeting; shall advance in every way possible the work of the Association; and shall be a general supervisor of all the work of the Associational Union. She shall keep in touch with the Societies by visiting, correspondence, and by sending literature; shall endeavor with the aid of her associates, to organize a W.M.S., Y.W.A., G.A., Sunbeam Band and Chapter of R.A.'s in every church of the Association. She shall send quarterly and annual reports to the State Executive Committee and Divisional Superintendent, and prepare a comprehensive report of the year's work for the annual meeting. She should attend, if possible, the Divisional Meetings and State W.M.U. Conventions and Associa-

tional Conference held at this time. She should also attend the General Alleghany Baptist Association and feel responsible that a report of W.M.U. is given and recorded in the minutes. She shall also endeavor to keep her associational work in line with the State and Southern W.M.U.

- 2. Assistant Superintendent. The assistance Superintendent shall preside at Associational and Executive Meetings in the absence or disability of the Superintendent, and assist in advancing all the work of the Associational Union.
- 3. Young People's Leader The Young People's Leader shall have general oversight of the Junior organizations, striving to organize a Y.W.A., a R.A., a G.A. and Sunbeam Band in each church of the association, visiting and helping foster in every way said organizations. She shall submit quarterly and annual reports to the Superintendent and to the State Young People's Secretary. She shall have charge of the Young People's Hour at the Associational meeting.
- 4. Secretary It will be the duty of the secretary to keep an accurate record of annual and Executive Committee Meetings; and notify committees of their appointment and perform any other duties generally imposed on this officer.
- 5. Treasurer The treasurer shall keep an accurate account of all money passing through her hands and shall make a report of same to the Associational Union.
- 6. Mission Study Chairman The Mission Study Chairman shall promote Mission Study in various churches of the Associations, endeavoring to reach the Societies through their Mission Study Chairman. She shall receive reports of the number of classes held, enrollment, and number of awards given in each organization submitting her report at the Associational Meeting. She shall also make reports to Divisional Chairmen of Mission Study, and to the State Chairman.
- 7. Stewardship Chairman It shall be the duty of the Stewardship Chairman to promote the teaching of stewardship in its fullest sense in the Missionary Societies of all grades in the Association following the plan outlined by our State and Southwide W.M.U. Stewardship Chairman. Reports should be made quarterly and annually to Division and State Chairman.
- 8. Community Missions The Community Missions Chairman shall urge cooperation with the Community Missions plans of the State and Southern Community Missions Chairman in organizing and directing the community mis-

sions work, in an effort to reach the oppressed and unsaved. She shall present this by talk, playlet, or conference whenever possible, and make an annual report at the Associational Meeting and send reports to Divisional and State Chairmen.

- 9. Margaret Fund Chairman It shall be the duty of the Margaret Fund Chairman to encourage the societies to give through the Annie W. Armstrong offering in March and to the Lottie Moon Christmas offering in December, to provide scholarships for missionary children's education in the homeland. She should keep in touch with the State Margaret Fund Chairman and cooperate in every possible way she suggests. She shall receive the Burney Gift from the Societies at the annual Associational Meeting and forward same to state headquarters.
- 10. Training School Chairman Training School Chairman can stress various ways in supporting this most worthy institution. She should urge liberal offering to the Heck Memorial offering and encourage programs on this cause.
- 11. Literature Chairman The Literature Chairman should urge subscribers to various Baptist papers and magazines and encourage reading more widely. She should take subscriptions for their periodicals at the annual meeting.
- 12. Executive Committee. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to carry out plans of W.M.U. W. and to transact all business between sessions of W.M.U. It shall meet at least annually and as many additional times as the Superintendent of the Association shall deem necessary. Five members shall constitute a quorum. When a vacancy occurs the Executive Committee shall be empowered to fill such vacancy for the remainder of the time unexpired. This committee shall name a month prior to Annual meeting a committee of three to nominate officers at Annual Meeting.

B. Associational Expenses

The expenses of Associational work shall be provided for by an annual contribution of not more than fifty cents per member from each society, same to be known as Associational Progress Fund.

C. Committees

The Superintendent shall appoint Committees on Time and Place and Resolutions. All of these committees shall be composed of three members each, and shall report during the session.
